faithfully and fearlessly he declares the Word of the Lord, the crushing judgment which is to fall upon the nation and her people.

Jeremiah was no volunteer like Isaiah,

Jeremiah received his call to the prophetic office at an early age, in the thirteenth year of King Josiah reign over Judah. He stands alone in circumstances of the most desperate and heart-breaking nature, yet

but rather was a person who recoiled from divine call, feeling both inadequate and immature. A man with an intensely sensitive nature, he was exposed to the worst kind of insults, to public embarrassment, and even to the disgrace of being placed in the stocks like a common criminal. (Jeremiah 20:2).

Jeremiah felt the deepest need for human companionship and love; yet he was alienated from his family, plotted against by his neighbors Jeremiah 11: 18-23), and was forbidden to marry (Jeremiah 16:2).

He apparently wanted nothing more from life than the opportunity to enjoy a quiet and peaceful fellowship with God;

yet he was forced by God to struggle publicly with kings, officials, and religious leaders who cared little or nothing about God.

Jeremiah was no plaster saint. He was a man and thoroughly human. As we

meet him within the pages of his book, we find him as difficult to understand as any other real person. He had his ups and downs and his strengths and weaknesses, but through it all, he was a man who knew God. However unsure he may have been of himself, he was never unsure of God.

the persons in the Riegelwood community. A series of meetings resulted in those area churches uniting to provide continuing relief efforts to affected families. The St. John Missionary Baptist Church has become the focal point for relief and assistance and it is through this Church, cooperating with other Churches and pastors in the community that our Convention will invest funds for relief.

The Convention has already provided funds for tarps to protect homes that were damaged, but not destroyed. We have also provided gift cards to allow families to purchase personal needs in the immediate aftermath of the storm. The need at this point is for money to purchase medicine, replace lost eyeglasses and wheelchairs; pay housing costs for persons who cannot return to their homes, provide housing and meals for volunteers who have come to the area to help with clean-up

efforts, and to provide for clothing and school supplies for children who lost everything in the storm.

The Pastors in the area have identified the families affected and have identified which needs are immediate. It is our hope to be able to quickly provide funds to assist in meeting those immediate needs. To this end, I am issuing an urgent appeal to all of our General Baptist Churches to send funds to our Baptist Headquarters earmarked for Tornado Relief that may be forwarded to help with the recovery.

Thank You in advance for the cooperation that I know you will give. Please respond as soon as you can so that the love of our Baptist family may be felt in the hearts and realized on the smiles of faces of our brothers and sisters in Riegelwood. Please continue in your work, as your giving and caring helps to convince the unconvinced to be convinced. ■

On the night before He was crucified, Jesus, while in great anguish, showed the human side of His nature and asked if there was another way For God's plan to be accomplished; "My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from Me" (Matthew 26:39a). Though He knew He would be physically, emotionally, and Spiritually tormented, nailed to a Cross, and hung until dead, He gave His life into the hands of the Father; "Yet, not as I will, but as You will" (Matthew 26:39b). And as sure as Jesus knew God's plan was for Him to die, He also knew He would Rise again; "And on the third day He will be raised to life" (Matthew 17:23).

On the third day after Jesus was crucified, Mary Magdalene and her Friends saw the empty tomb and immediately ran to tell the disciples; "But

they did not believe the women, because their words seemed to them Like nonsense" (Luke 24:11). Even after Peter saw the empty tomb for Himself, he was perplexed; "He went away, wondering to himself what had Happened" (Luke 24:12).

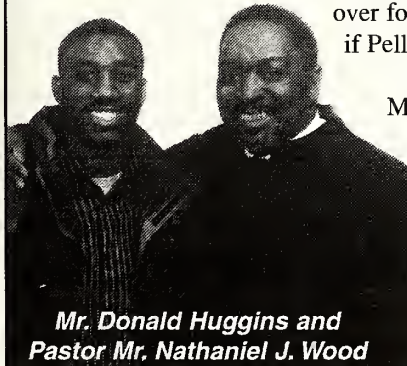

## Convention History

The Woman's Baptist Home and Foreign Missionary Convention (WBH&FMC) is an auxiliary to the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, Inc. The General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, Inc., (then called the Educational and Missionary Convention) was organized in 1867. "As the fields grew whiter and the laborers increased, there was a great need for a Woman's Convention in North Carolina," which would reach "back into the minds and hearts of men." (See 1867-1967: The Centennial Celebration of the General Baptist State Convention...)

Thus in 1884, "some North Carolina Missionary Baptist women felt the call to mission and responded by banding themselves together under the leadership of the late Reverend Dr. Henry Martin Tupper (himself an American Baptist missionary, founder and first president of Shaw University, Raleigh, North Carolina) and formed the Woman's Convention. Among some of the founders were Mrs. N. F. Roberts, Mrs. Hattie E. Shephard, Miss Helen Jackson, Mrs. Sallie A. Mial, and Mrs. B. E. Green." (See A Handbook And Study Guide for Missionary Baptist Women.) "The women felt they could render a more effective service by bringing together the widely scattered missionary societies under one banner." (See History of the Woman's Baptist Home and Foreign Missionary Convention of North Carolina.)

Over the years, the Convention has experienced tremendous growth. Very early in the organizational plan, the leaders saw the need to educate children in Christian and missionary education. A Junior Department was organized in 1924, and in 1971, the name was changed to Youth Department. In 1964, the Young Adult Department was formed to bridge the gap between the already existing seniors and the youth.

In 1946 the Convention assumed the position of Auxiliary to the General Baptist State Convention (GBSC).

### Convention Purpose

The Woman's Baptist Home and Foreign Missionary Convention's purpose is to:

- Organize and improve missionary circles in Baptist churches of North Carolina, by inspiring fellowship, spiritual growth, and unity in purpose.
- Promote a broader missionary spirit and endeavor
- To encourage study of the Bible and other missionary literature in order to awaken a greater interest in missionary work
- To support missionaries at home and abroad
- To support Christian education
- To cooperate with the parent body (GBSC)

### What Is A Missionary?

A missionary is a Christian messenger sent forth by divine authority for the purpose of presenting the gospel across national, cultural or religious lines for the conversion of the unbeliever. The word "missionary" comes from the Latin word "mitto" which means "I send," and is related to the Greek word "apostello" which means, "to send."

As members of the Woman's Baptist Home and Foreign Missionary Convention, we are missionaries who have had a biblical mandate to help spread the gospel. By joining together in a convention, local churches are able to pool their spiritual gifts, resources, skills, talents, and time to do the most good for the most in need.

### Ministry of Missions

- County and Community Missions: an out-reach ministry to provide spiritual strength to those in need
- The Family Altar: a united effort on the part of family members to keep the family fires burning through daily prayers

and Bible reading.

- Self-Denial Stewardship Tithing: Much of the conventional work is supported through tithing, free-will and self-denial offerings of the members.

• The State-wide Leaders' Workshop: This workshop, held in April, provides information and training to Officers, Committee Chairpersons, and Special Workers, on how to become efficient leaders on the state and local levels.

• The Leadership Training Conference: This five-day Conference, held annually the first week of June, provides training for missionaries as leaders in church, community, and convention activities.

• The Youth Bible Camp: This five-day, three week camp program for youth is held annually in June at the J. J. Johnson Baptist Assembly, located in Laurel Hill, NC. Programs and activities are designed to meet the needs and interests of young people as they are prepared to become efficient followers and leaders in churches, unions, auxiliaries, and throughout the world.

• The Missionary Training Institutes: These institutes are designed to provide special training for missionary leaders and workers in the churches, city and county unions, and auxiliaries, through the study of special text books, convention literature and publications. The institute classes are taught by the Convention's certified personnel.

• The Missionary Mass Meeting: This meeting provides an opportunity for seniors, young adults, and youth to assemble in local, city or county gatherings to share missions progress and encourage one another in Christian service.

• Youth Inspirational Meetings: These meetings are designed to motivate our young people in their commitment and involvement in Christian service.

• Youth Evangelism Conference: This Conference, held the first Saturday in November, provides a prayerful and spiritual atmosphere for teaching youth about salvation, why and how to witness, and offer testimonies of their faith through growth in Christ.

• Young Adult Fellowship Meetings: These meetings consist of spiritual activities offering thanks and adoration to God as well as growth through fellowship.

• Young Adult Retreat: a retreat held the first Saturday in June for mutual discussion and fellowship.

• Ministers' Wives Retreat: a retreat held the first Saturday in May for strength and fellowship.

• Family Missions Conference: held the fourth Saturday in September for strengthening the family.

• Central Children's Home and WBC&FMC Day: a biannual program during August at the Central Children's Home to encourage the children in educational endeavors.

#### BASIC PRINCIPLES FOR TEACHING THE BIBLE

- Study every passage within its literary context. Literary context includes both a text's immediate setting (the verses around it) and its relationship to the entire book.
- Recognize that the cultural, social and historical environment represented in a biblical passage differs from that of today, and then try to understand a passage in light of those differences.
- Translations often reflect the translator's understanding. Therefore, when

studying a passage, compare several translations, or versions, to try and discover the most likely meaning of a word or phrase.

• Interpret any single passage in light of what the author has written elsewhere. Interpret the Bible as a whole. That is, interpret the Bible in light of the entire message of the Bible.

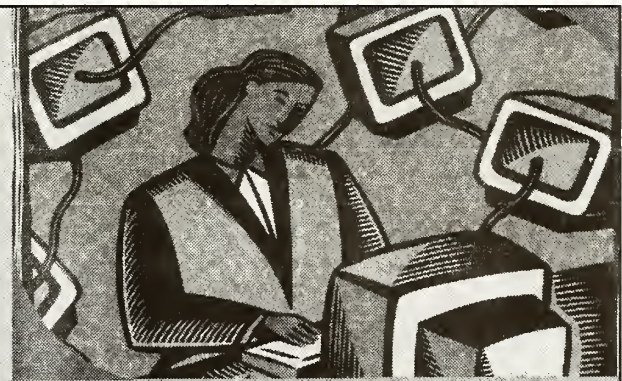

## Roth IRAs Provide Big Advantages to Investors

Would you like to have an opportunity to not pay taxes on your investment income? You may have that chance! A Roth IRA takes today's after-tax income and allows it to grow and be withdrawn tax-free after age 59 1/2 if the account has been set up for 5 years.

### Advantages

There are many advantages to investing in a Roth IRA. These advantages include the tax-free distribution and that you never have to withdraw the money after age 70 1/2, like a traditional IRA. There are no age limits, unlike a traditional IRA. A 95-year-old working

part time can contribute to a Roth IRA. The range of possible investments are greater than those allowed in a 401K plan and include church bonds, mutual funds, and Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs). A Roth can fund qualified educational expenses, provide up to \$10,000 to buy a home for family members who have not lived in a home for two years, and pay medical bills above 7.5% of income, among other uses. Advisors love them. After employer-matched 401k funds, for most people it is the best investment.

### Who Should Invest in a Roth IRA?

Most people should invest in a Roth IRA. In 2003, federal tax rates were reduced to their lowest rates in years. The lowest tax bracket in 1974 was 14% and the highest was 70%. In 2005, the lowest tax bracket is 10% and the highest bracket is 35%. If you believe that your tax bracket will increase in the future or that Congress will raise the tax rates again, then you owe it to yourself to look into a Roth IRA.

### Differences from a Traditional IRA

The appeal of a Traditional IRA is that it delays paying income taxes on your retirement investment until you withdraw it. At age 70 1/2 you must start withdrawing money from your account and pay income taxes on it, even if you don't need the money then. This is called a "required minimum distribution". Many of my clients complain about having to do this. It hurts their retirement income and their ability to enjoy their retirement. If they are still earning money, they may be forced into a higher tax bracket. If they are not working, then they lose the ability to grow each year's withdrawal tax-free.

Roth IRAs do have a higher allowable income limit for contributions if a person is covered by an employer pension or other retirement plan. A non-deductible contribution to a traditional IRA can be made if one is over the limit.

### Contribution Amounts

For 2007, the amount is \$5,000 for those 50 or older and \$4,000 for those under 50. You have until April 15, 2007 to make a contribution for 2006. You can have both an IRA and a Roth-IRA, however, the total contributed to both plans

must not exceed the \$5,000 annual IRS limit.

### Income Requirements

Congress sees these accounts as a tax break for the middle class and excludes higher-income earners. You or your spouse must have earned income and meet the income guidelines. The amount allowed is based upon your Federal income tax filing status. I am available to discuss these requirements with you to see if you qualify. You may reach me directly at 919-858-7819.

Johnson Baptist Assembly in Laurel Hill including gas, electricity, telephones, custodial services, lawn upkeep and grass cutting, heating & air conditioning maintenance, plumbing, upkeep of swimming pool, and certified pool operators and life guards.

Expenses for each Session of the Parent Body and Auxiliaries which includes: Rental of facilities like convention centers, printing of materials for Sessions, preparation of registration kits and badges, staff travel to make arrangement for host pastors and host Churches, lodging for staff and special guests. Banquet costs including food, rental of space, service fees, mailings, publicity and advertising, awards and plaques.

## New North Carolina laws effective December 1, 2006

(ABCNEWS.com)

- Everyone riding in the back seat of a passenger car must wear a seat belt. Seat belt laws already cover people in front and children.
- It is illegal to disrupt a funeral or memorial service, or to chant, yell or hoist threatening signs along a funeral procession route.
- Drivers younger than 18 cannot drive and talk on the phone at the same time, unless they are calling 911 or a hospital, or talking to their spouse, mom, dad or legal guardian.
- New laws governing sex offenders stipulate they cannot live within 1,000 feet of schools or child-care centers. Sex offender registration requirements also are tighter.

- Having alcohol on your breath if you are under 21. There are medical and religious exceptions. Previously, underage drinkers were charged only for purchasing or possessing alcohol in a container.

- Two new felony offenses for causing serious injury by vehicle, and two new felony offenses for aggravated or repeat death by vehicle.

- Driving a lawn mower or riding a bicycle while impaired.

### Several measures are aimed at repeat DWI offenders:

- More impaired drivers who are arrested with a revoked license or no license will be subject to having their cars seized.

- Before their driving privileges are restored, more drivers will have to install ignition interlock devices that prevent the car from starting if there is alcohol on the driver's breath.

- Violators will face extra penalties

for habitual impaired driving, starting with the fourth DWI offense in 10 years. Previously, the rule applied only for a fourth offense in seven years.

### Law enforcement officers and prosecutors have new authority to:

- Get a blood or urine sample if you refuse to submit to a breath analysis.

- Prove you are guilty of DWI if your breath test shows a blood-alcohol reading of 0.08 percent.

- Bolster the case against you with testimony from experts in accident reconstruction and drug impairment recognition, and with results of a roadside breath alcohol test.

- Present the results of a roadside Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test, which indicates the extent of alcohol or drug impairment according to how smoothly your eyes can track a moving object.

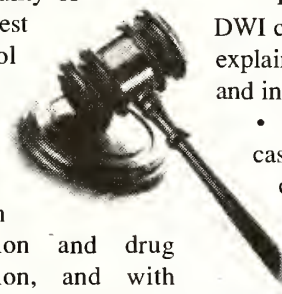
- Learn more about the defense lawyer's strategy before the trial starts. Most motions to suppress evidence or dismiss charges must be filed in writing, in advance.

### Judges and prosecutors are more accountable for decisions to dismiss charges or acquit defendants:

- Prosecutors who reduce or drop DWI charges must provide reasons and explain the case in detail — in court and in writing.

- Courts must keep a database of cases, and detailed records on DWI convictions including the names of judges and attorneys.

- Eventually, after state recordkeeping is upgraded, a free Web site will enable the public to track DWI cases handled by every prosecutor, judge and defense attorney in North Carolina.

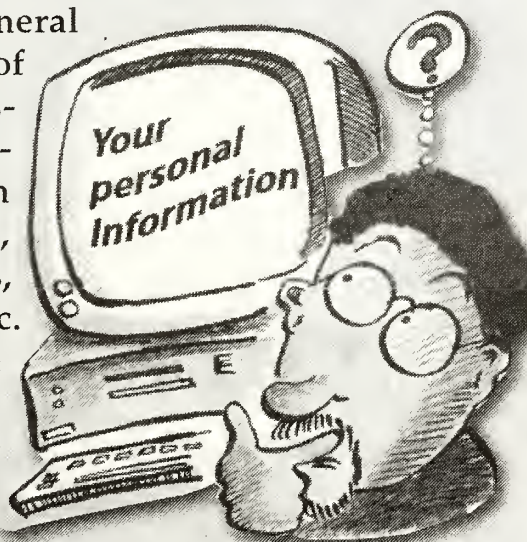

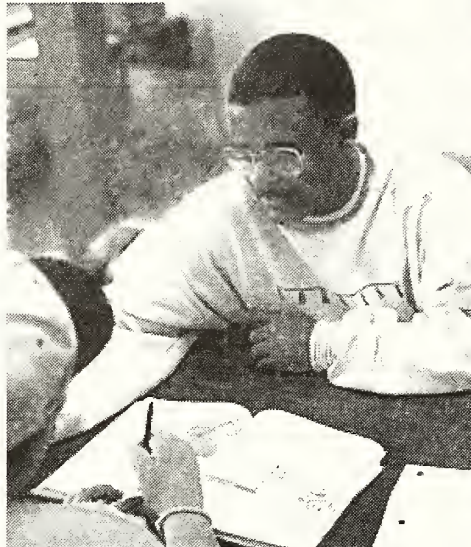

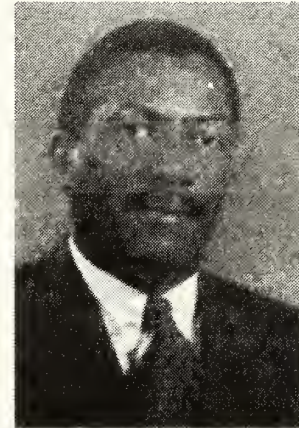


**Ben Ruffin, former UNC and RJR executive, dies in Winston-Salem**

Benjamin S. Ruffin, a one-time aide to Gov. Jim Hunt and the first black chairman of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors, died Thursday, December 7, after an apparent heart attack. Ruffin, 64, suffered the heart attack at his home in this Winston-Salem and could not be revived.

1998, Ruffin became the first black to be elected chairman of the board that oversees the university's 16-campus system. At the time, he was also a vice president for corporate affairs at R.J. Reynolds Tobacco, but retired the next year to focus more attention on his work with the university system.

Ruffin previously worked as a vice president with the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Co. and served as a special assistant to former Gov. Jim Hunt.



At the time of his death, Ruffin was an emeritus member of the university system's Board of Governors. Ruffin received a bachelor's degree in education from North Carolina Central University and a master's in social work from the UNC Chapel Hill.

He is survived by his wife, Avon, and two children.

# Dr. Charles T. Bullock Ends Tenure as President of GBSC of NC, Inc.

The 139<sup>th</sup> Annual Session of the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina was held on October 29 - November 2, 2006, at the Benton Convention Center in Winston Salem, North Carolina. Dr. Serenus Chum, Sr., the Senior Pastor of Mount Zion Baptist Church, served as host pastor.

On Wednesday, November 1, some of the members of the Martin Street Baptist Church of Raleigh traveled by chartered bus and individual cars to the convention to support their pastor, Dr. Charles T. Bullock who would be delivering his last address as president.

At 9:45 A.M., Reverend Haywood Gray, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the General Baptist State Convention, presented the New Baptist Life NC Website. Following this presentation, it was 10:00 A.M., and there was the Presidential Processional including Dr. Shirley Bullock, wife of the outgoing president, Dr. Charles T. Bullock.

From 10:05 until 11:00 A. M., the time was reserved for Presidential Tributes. The Shaw University Choir set the tone for the hour by singing the well-known hymn, "Now Thank We All Our God." Reverend Haywood Gray presented a video tribute to Dr. Bullock and his wife, Dr. Shirley Bullock. The video

portrayed Dr. Bullock as a scholar, teacher, world traveler, and a preacher. He also emphasized the fact that the Convention is on solid ground financially. It took the effort and support from many under Dr. Bullock's leadership.

Dr. Clarence Newsome, President of Shaw University, presented a resolution. His message followed on the subject titled: "Proclaim God's Marvelcy." He thanked the Convention for the marvelous support of Shaw.

Representatives of North Carolina Mutual Insurance Company were on hand to pay special tributes to Dr. Bullock. Dr. John H. Grant, Vice President at Large followed with a glowing tribute on behalf of the Convention.

Deacon Horace Smith, Chairman of the Martin Street Baptist Church's Deacon Board presented a monetary gift from the church. Stephanie Sanders, who is president of the Ladies Auxiliary, presented a gift to Dr. Shirley Bullock.

Dr. Percy High of Durham, who is a former member of Martin Street Baptist Church since his childhood, paid a special tribute to the outgoing president. He announced that a special offering would be taken for Dr. Bullock. He challenged the ministers to take the lead.

The highlight of the Morning Session was Dr. Bullock's address. He was presented before the Shaw Choir sang its final selection. Dr. Bullock began by thanking the Shaw Choir and the officers. In fact, he presented his wife a bouquet of blue roses and thanked her for the strong support she

had given him during his four-year tenure as president. He then presented an award to each of the officers who served.

"We give God the Glory," he said in the beginning. "We have 1,600 churches in North Carolina with a total membership of over 5000,000. By the way, 87% of the money has been spent on programs."

Dr. Bullock chose his topic from Judges 6:12-17, and it was as follows: "Commissioned by God." He began by reminding the audience about the Israelites and how they worshipped Baal and other idol gods. He also read Psalm 139. God called Gideon to deliver the Israelites, but first had to get Gideon's attention. God told him to go, and "I am with thee." "God is and will be with us," stated Dr. Bullock. "We must have a relationship with God," he continued. "We all need the Holy Spirit."


Dr. Bullock commended Reverend Haywood Gray and talked about his great work with the Convention. He reflected on the condition of the Convention when he and reverend Gray began their work. They did not allow fear to stop them from working or to hold them back. He reminded his audience that fear is a dangerous thing. They stepped out on faith. They had some good days referring to the General Baptist Convention. However, there were some sleepless nights.

In conclusion, "Gideon was successful in delivering the Israelites out of the hands of the Midianites. Through faith in God, work and prayer, the Baptist Convention has been delivered also."

Some 1,500 voting delegates were present for the election which was scheduled for 1:30 P. M. There were workshops on "Health Awareness," "Tobacco-Free Environments," "Long Term Health Care," and "Taking Control of Our Lifestyles."


The election was delayed, and there had to be a Runoff Election. It was late afternoon when the first Election ended, so it was late when the final results were known.

The new president of the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, Inc. is Dr. Gregory K. Moss, Sr., of Charlotte. ■

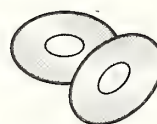

When the Apostle Paul met Jesus on  
the road to Damascus, his life was for-  
ever changed. Prior to meeting Jesus,

Paul had been given the task of  
preaching the gospel of God's grace  
through faith in Jesus — and he would  
do so for the remainder of his life. But  
Paul would endure many trials along  
the way. He faced those who desired to  
take his life and others who simply  
refused to listen to his message ... but  
he continued on. Colossians 1:29

“To this end I labor, struggling with  
all His energy, which so Powerfully  
works in me.”

Paul was “breathing  
out murderous  
threats against the  
Lord's disciples”  
(Acts 9:1). After the  
encounter with  
Jesus and being  
filled with the Holy  
Spirit, Paul “began  
to preach in the syn-  
agogues that Jesus  
is the Son of God”

Paul “labored” and “struggled” with  
the task he had been given. But rather  
than rely on his own strength and abili-  
ties, Paul learned to labor with the  
energy of Christ.

The word Paul used for “energy”  
refers to the active working of God's  
power. Paul used this same word to  
describe the power all believers. “That  
power is like the working {energy} of  
his mighty strength, which He exerted  
in Christ when He raised Him from the  
dead and seated Him at the right hand  
in the Heavenly realms” (Ephesians  
1:19-20).

There will be times of overwhelming  
adversity when God simply takes  
charge and directly fights the enemy.  
But, for the majority of our journey,  
God directs us to continue the daily  
labor of accomplishing his work. Jesus  
said the burden of this work will be  
greatly eased As we learn to attach our-  
selves to Him and walk by His side;  
“For My yoke is easy and My burden  
is light” (Matthew 11:30).

We only fail when we fail to trust; “I  
can do EVERYTHING through Him  
who gives me strength” (Philippians

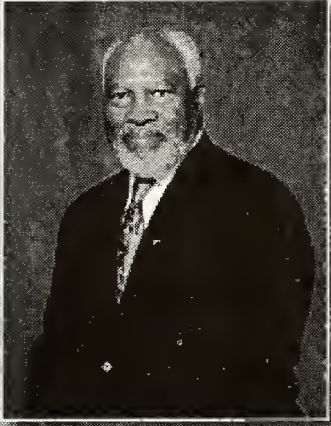

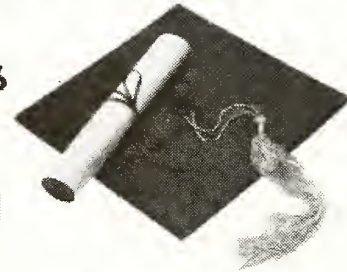

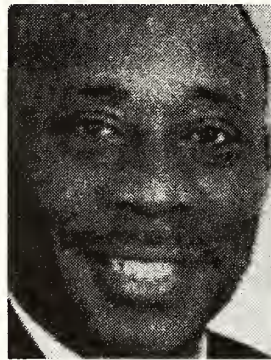

State Sen. Robert Holloman, recently elected to his third term, died Monday, January 8, 2007, at age 53.

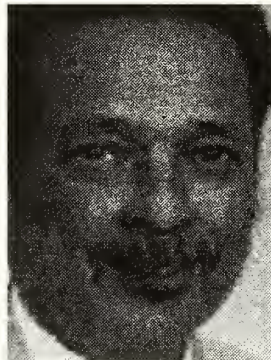
Holloman, who lived in Ahoskie, was a pastor at Nebo Missionary Baptist Church in Murfreesboro.

# GBSC Takes "AIM" at Crime and Incarceration in 2007

President Gregory K. Moss, Sr. announced at the General Board session held on Thursday, December 28, 2006 at Christian Faith Baptist Church (Dr. David C. Forbes, Sr., Pastor) in Raleigh, NC the reactivation of the GBSC's efforts to reach lives impacted by crime and incarceration. President Moss appointed Reverend Michael R. Smith, Sr. as the Chairman and Reverend Melvin B. Solomon as the Vice-Chairman in leading the GBSC's efforts in this mission field. Chairman Smith has begun our efforts by seeking out persons from around the state that are willing to work with this ministry. Secondly, the strategic name of this ministry will be known as the Anti-Crime and Incarceration Ministry (AIM). Thirdly, AIM will seek to provide education and training to GBSC churches in the four areas of (1) At-Risk Youth (Prevention), (2) In-Prison (Reaching), (3) Aftercare (Restoration), and (4) Victims of Crime (Reconciliation). We are at a crisis stage in our state and nation when it comes to crime and incarceration. We must respond to the crisis with the compassion of Christ and effective ministries. Join us in taking AIM in 2007 at saving our at-risk youth, reducing crime in our neighborhoods, reaching the prisoner, restoring persons leaving prison, and reconciling/healing the victims of crime. # President Attends Riegelwood Dedication

President Gregory K. Moss, Sr. and Executive Secretary-Treasurer traveled to Riegelwood, NC on Thursday, January 25 to assess recovery efforts in that community following the tornado of November 16. The President participated in the dedication of the first new home site being rebuilt on the site of the tornado. Rev. Darryl Todd (Pastor of St. John Missionary Baptist Church in Riegelwood) has been the GBSC's primary contact in the area. The

President and Executive Secretary-Treasurer also attended a meeting of community volunteers and agencies that are coordinating relief efforts earlier in the day

The clean-up efforts are primarily finished and the community is now focusing on repair and rebuilding.

According to Pastor Todd, approximately 108 persons were affected by the disaster. The number of homes affected was 64, 32 people were hospitalized as a result of the storm, and 8 people died as a result of the tornado.

Local plans are to build fourteen (14) homes in the affected area over the next five months. Funds from the GBSC will assist in purchasing building permits, building supplies, appliances, and a month's supply of groceries once families move in.

### Deacon and Deaconess Workshop

#### Deacon Ministry

#### DEACON MINISTRY MANUAL

#### Baptist Deacons

Baptist believes that the process of selecting deacons involves the entire congregation. Although churches differ in regard to the details of the process, the common practice is for the entire church to vote on who will be selected as deacons.

In many churches, deacons are asked to evaluate and recommend major matters to be brought to the entire congregation for vote. Churches involve deacons in various ministries, such as visiting the sick, helping families in distress and providing relief to the poor.

#### Baptist Ordination

Baptists believe ordination does not endow a person with any special powers or authority. It is a means of indicating to churches and to the world in general that a person has been accredited as worthy to be a pastor or deacon.

#### Deacons In Scripture

##### A. The Office of Deacon Defined

The office of deacon was created in the early church for the purpose of enabling the pastor to minister the Word of God to the church body. (Acts 6:2-4) The word "diakonos" primarily means "one who serves at tables." Thus, we believe that the role of the deacon is to serve the Lord by caring for the physical and spiritual needs of the church body.

##### Standards of Life and Character

Selection to the office of deacon in the Baptist Church is based on the standards found in Acts 6 and I Timothy 3. These standards are essential to the services of the deacon.

##### Deacons in the New Testament

Stephen is the most significant Biblical example of a New Testament deacon. It is obvious from the context of

Acts 6-7, that God mightily used Stephen in the 1st century Church. Stephen and the other deacons were men "full of the Spirit and wisdom" (v.3), elected by the church (v.5) and ordained by the apostles (v.6). The deacon's purpose was to perform tasks of service and ministry to the local church so that the Apostles would not have to "neglect the ministry of the word of God."

##### I. Deacons Ministry (1 Timothy 3:8-10, 12)

##### A. Their Personal Character (v. 8)

1. "Grave"—Dignified

One who serves as a deacon understands the seriousness of spiritual issues. The deacon should not be flippant or frivolous, or make light of serious matters.

2. "Not double-tongued"—Not a malicious gossip

What is a two-tongued person? A gossip—someone who is quick to discuss private matters. Also, such a person is apt to say one thing to one person and another to someone else to gain his or her own personal goals.

Because deacons are privy to certain private matters and grave spiritual issues, they need to know how to speak with integrity at the appropriate times.

3. "Not given to much wine"—Not a drunkard

The deacon should be known as someone who doesn't allow drink to influence his or her life.

4. "Not greedy of filthy lucre"—Not a greedy person

In New Testament times those who served in the church would be involved in passing out money to widows, orphans, and needy people. They would also be collecting money and dispensing it for various purposes to carry on the business of the church. There were no banks and audit firms, so every transaction was made in cash. The people who handled the money actually carried it in a little purse on their belt. The temptation was always present to use the money for one's own purposes. So an

official servant in the church had to be free from the love of money.

##### B. Their Spiritual Life (v. 9)

"Holding the mystery of the faith in a pure conscience."

A pure conscience exists only when a person lives out his biblical convictions.

##### C. Their Spiritual Service (v. 10a)

"Let these also first be proved [tested]; then let them use the office of a deacon."

Deacons need to demonstrate leadership in his home.. They must manage their children and possessions. They prove they have leadership ability by how capably they handle situations and solve problems in their home. They are to be models for everyone to follow.

- c. Temperate (11c)
- d. Faithful in all things (11d)

The duties of the deaconess are as follows. First, support their spouse in their role as Spiritual leader. This may involve home visits and other tasks outside/inside the church. The Deaconess must be familiar with the church doctrines. She should also know the policies and practices of the church so that all of the officers can work in peace and harmony.

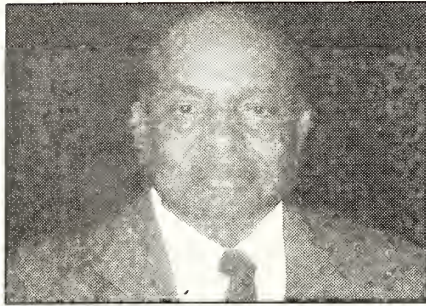

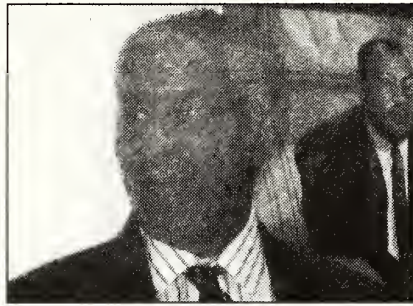
**Dr. George C. Debnam**

The **AIM** conferences will be announced in the Baptist Informer. I exhort all GBSC Moderators and churches to pray and take advantage of **AIM** in order to reach, reconcile. And

restore lives impacted by crime and incarceration. **Join us as we "Overcome Evil with Good" Romans 12:21.**

## Ammons going to Florida

NCCU Chancellor to become President of FAMU



Chancellor James H. Ammons is leaving N.C. Central University for a new job in Florida after increasing enrollment on the Durham campus and preparing it for ambitious strides in biotechnology research.

On Thursday, February 1, 2007, Florida A&M University trustees ended months of speculation about whether Ammons would return to Tallahassee. After a daylong meeting and a 7-6 vote, the FAMU trustees selected Ammons to be the next president of his alma mater.

It was unclear Thursday when Ammons would leave NCCU, where he has been for six years. The FAMU

board's decision is to be ratified March 8. Contract negotiations are expected to begin in the coming weeks.

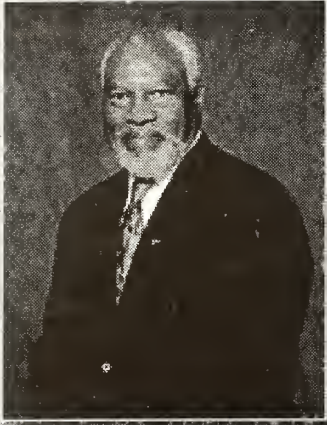
The decision means NCCU will be the fourth historically black UNC system school looking for a new leader within a six-month period.

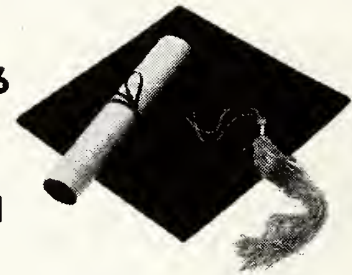

## Holmes accepts position with State Department of Health and Human Services

Anita Holmes CEO of the Center for Health and Healing since 2000 has accepted a senior position with the State Department of Health and Human Services. Anita has been closely associated with Health and Human Services since 1991. Prior to accepting the Directorship in 2000, she served as planner and consultant. Outstanding achievements during her

administration included initiation of the Healthy Beginnings project, a church based service in Northampton and Bertie counties with focus of reducing disparities in infant and maternal health. The core volunteers are church women who provide counsel, moral support and spiritual guidance to pregnant women and new mothers. The focus is to encourage and enable their participation with public agencies and other resources helpful in personal development and the health and welfare of themselves and their children. Over the past five years churches affiliated with the County Line, Franklin Shiloh, and Middle Baptist Associations

These structural changes enabled advantage in competition for resources in the broader environment.

The Smoking prevention activity under the management of Toshia Davis Jordan with strong collaboration with the

Laymen's League has involved GBSC youth in spreading the message about the dangers of tobacco use. The campaign to declare church buildings and grounds smoke free is well received.

Cornell Wright hired in 2004 as assistant to Dr. Linda Gilliam, Director of the Health Careers program has been promoted to coordinator status. He has found satisfaction in helping youth to consider the value to society and themselves a career in health services can provide.

The Center is blessed with highly motivated staff who embraces the notion that faith is a factor in achieving and maintaining good health.

John Hatch, senior program development officer with the Center is Acting Executive Director and Dora Moore continues as the administrative coordinator. The Rev. Jeffrey Simms is chairman of the Board of Directors.

The search for an Executive Director of the Center for Health and Healing has begun.

## FROM LIFE TO EVERLASTING LIFE: DR. WESLEY GRANT, SR. (1915-2007)

With sympathy and prayers, we announce the death of **THE REV. DR. WESLEY GRANT, SR.** The funeral service will be held at 12:00 Noon Wednesday, February 7, 2007 in Mt. Zion Missionary Baptist Church, 47 Eagle Street, Asheville. Drs. John H. Grant and Louis E. Grant will officiate, burial will be in Sunset Cemetery.

Rev. Dr. Wesley Grant Sr., 92, of 97 Choctaw Street, Asheville, NC, died peacefully on Friday, Feb. 2, 2007. Born Jan. 31, 1915 in Sumter, S.C. to the late Jake and Rosa Pinkney Grant, he was a resident of Asheville for 75 years. He was married to Dr. Arsie M. Hon Grant who preceded him in death on March 18, 1990. He was later married to Mrs. Frances Shearer.

Rev. Grant received his education in the Sumter City Schools. He attended Shaw University Extension Classes, Shaw University Summer Convention Classes, and received Honorary Doctorates from Covington Theological Seminary and Emmanuel Theological Seminary.

He was united with First Baptist Church in Sumter in 1927 and 1930 with Mount Zion Missionary Baptist Church in Asheville. In 1942 he was pastored New Bethel Missionary Baptist Church; 1950's Concord Missionary Baptist Church, now known as Pleasant Hill Missionary Baptist Church in Fletcher; In 1958 he founded, built, and was current Co-Pastor of Worldwide Missionary Baptist Tabernacle; In 1957 he was Radio Pastor at Radio Station WBMT in Black Mountain; 1962 Count On Me at WFGW/WMIT Billy Graham stations (Blue Ridge Broadcasting), and 1968 to 1984 Count On Me television program, WLOS TV Channel 13 in Asheville.

Rev. Grant was a Civil Rights Activist. He was nominated Pastor of the Year, Shaw University; received the Covington Theological Seminary Adjunct Faculty Award, WKDB-FM 1st Annual African American Award, Lott Carey Award: Men of Troas; National Baptist Convention of America, Inc; City of Asheville Proclamation: Dr. Wesley Grant Sr. Day 1999-2007; Dr. Wesley Grant Sr. Day Mud Creek Missionary Baptist Association 2005 and



2006; Interdenominational Ministers Alliance Award, City-Wide Usher's Union Award; Shaw University Alumni Asheville Chapter, N. M. Avery Preacher of the Year Award and Baptist Ministers Union Lifetime Distinction Award.

### THE HISTORY OF THE BAPTIST INFORMER (65 YEARS OLD) February 1942-February 2007

The incorporation of the Baptist Sentinel Publishing Company is dated April 27, 1905. It remained as the official organ of the Convention. Taking over the paper in 1942, Reverend Otis Hairston was the editor for fourteen years. During his regime, the name of the paper was change from, the *Union Reformer* to the *Baptist Informer*. In an attempt to give North Carolina Baptists a more attractive publication with a name more meaningful the journal was changed to a 16-page magazine, and the name to Baptist Informer, February, 1942. Since 2005, Mrs. Portia H. Brandon, M. Div., serves as the Managing Editor.

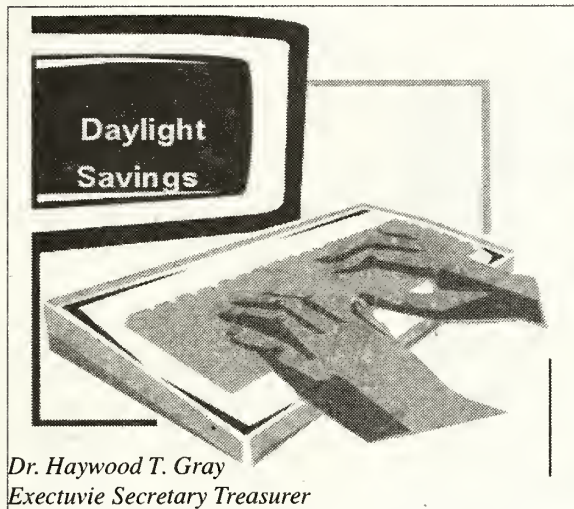

## IS YOUR COMPUTER READY FOR MARCH 11 DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME?

Normally, your computers handle the spring and fall Daylight Savings Time changes automatically because the change dates are built into the operating system software. I bet you didn't even realize it was being done for you! This year, Congress amended the Uniform Time Act of 1996 by changing the start and end dates of Daylight Savings Time (DST) beginning in 2007. Daylight Savings Time will now begin March 11 and will end on November 4 (instead of the usual April and-October dates we are all used to). Since these dates are different than what the computers know, this change will require modification to your computer operating systems. In other words, the internal clocks on your systems (servers, PC/workstations, tablets, and handhelds) may require adjustment to accommodate the change.

Though the impact to most computers is expected to be low, please be aware that time-specific functions may be off by one hour, such as scheduled system backups or data uploads. We strongly recommend that you apply the following updates to your system.

**If your Microsoft Windows computer is configured to download and apply Microsoft Windows patches auto-**

**matically, one of the patches will make the appropriate changes and you do not need to do anything.** Otherwise, or if you are not sure that your computer is configured this way, then there is a very easy-to-use tool called **TZedit that is available through the Microsoft Website.** TZedit will let you edit the time zone information manually in Windows.

To manually modify time zone settings by using the Time Zone Editor, follow these steps:

- 1) Download and start Time Zone Editor as explained above
- 2) In the Time Zones list, select your time zone. For our area, click (GMT-05:00) Eastern

Time (US & Canada), and then click Edit.

- 3) In the Edit Time Zone dialog box, click to select the Automatically Set Daylight Saving Time check box

- 4) Specify the correct daylight saving time start date and end date as follows.

- 5) In the Start Day box, click the number of the day, the corresponding day of the week, and the month that you want. For example, click Second, click Sunday, and then click March. Then select the time that you want to start daylight saving time. For example, select 2:00 A.M.

- 6) In the Last Day box, click the number of the day, the corre-

sponding day of the week, and the month that you want. For example, click First, click Sunday, and then click November. Then select the time that you want to end daylight saving time. For example, select 2:00 A.M.

- 7) In the Daylight Bias list, select how long you want the time to change when daylight saving time is in effect. For example, to set the clock forward 1 hour, leave the default setting of +1:00.

- 8) To finish with this time zone, click OK.

- 9) If you wish to edit other time zones, select each one and then repeat steps a-e. As long as your computer stays here in the Eastern Time Zone, there is no need to change the other zones. (For more information about the time zones that have changed, click the following article number to view the article in the Microsoft Knowledge Base: 931836 (<http://support.microsoft.com/kb/931836/>) February 2007 cumulative time zone update rollout for Microsoft Windows operating systems.)

- 10) When you have finished; click Close.

The last step is to activate the changes that you just completed. To do that, follow these last few steps:

- 1) Double-click the digital clock in the lower right-hand corner of your screen. (If you don't see it, then click Start, then Settings, then Control Panel, and then double-click Date/Time.)

- 2) Click the Time Zone tab.

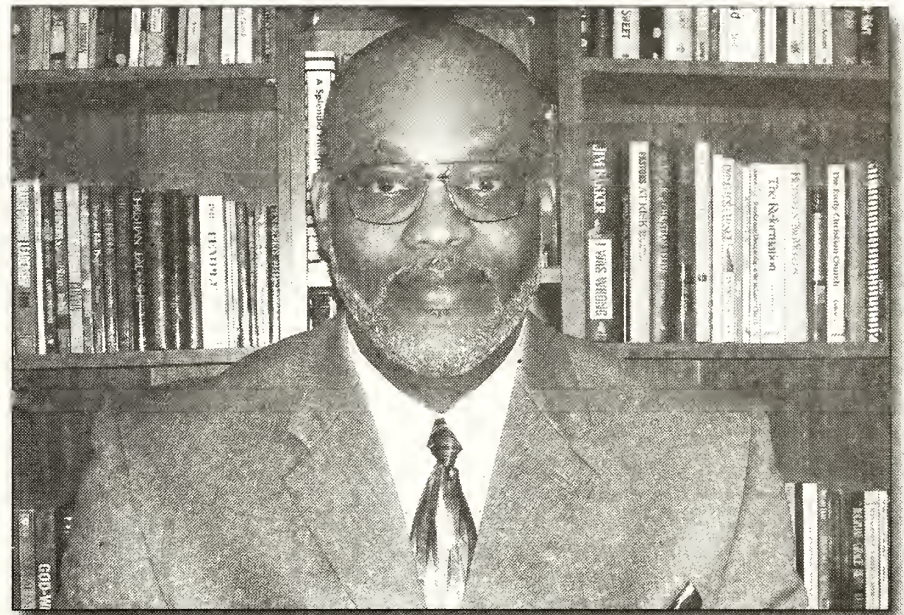
- 3) Select a different time zone than our local (GMT-05:00) Eastern Time (US & Canada) time zone, and then click Apply

- 4) Click (GMT-05:00) Eastern Time (US & Canada), and then click OK to set it back where it belongs.

- 5) Close the Windows Time Zone Editor.

## Overcoming Evil With Good Through Prayer

In this article I want to share with you what is absolutely essential in our efforts to reach, reconcile and restore lives impacted by crime and incarceration. The key is strategic intercessory prayer. I sense many times the issue of prayer is underestimated in its importance in fighting crime. Prayer calls us to realize only through the intervention of our Father God's mercy, justice and angelic assistance can we make a difference. The Word of God says, "We wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places" (Ephesians 6:12). I want to serve notice it is through the intercessory prayers of the righteous that crime and incarceration issues can be impacted. Yet in the mean time, the Church is at war with our deadly enemy satan and demonic forces.

I believe when we stand on the Word of God and call on our Father and Jesus Christ in prayer, the Holy Spirit transforms us and the situations we are fighting. If we are to make a difference in fighting crime,

we must discipline ourselves to strategically intercede in accordance with the Will and Word of God.

Therefore, I am asking every GBSC church to include in your prayer ministry strategic intercessory prayer for the issues of crime and incarceration. Don't give up on that wayward youth, that relative in prison, the person coming out of prison, or the healing of victims of crime. Pray for divine intervention based on God's justice and mercy. Pray for those in authority over our law enforcement, legislative, judicial, and correctional systems. Don't throw your hands up in the air, but call on the NAME above every name who alone is able to answer our prayers. You may never actively get involved with a gang banger, go in a prison, help a person getting out of prison, or minister to a crime victim, but you can pray. Jesus is our greatest example of making intercessory prayer for lives impacted by crime and incarceration. For it was on the cross, where He prayed, "Father forgive them for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34).

This intercessory prayer was for your crimes and my crimes against our Father God. Now that we have been forgiven, our intercessory prayers are vital in fighting crime in our society. We must pray and intercede for His justice and mercy to reign in the earth!

## Shaw gets \$5 million donation

Wall Street multimillionaire John Mack and his wife will give Raleigh's Shaw University \$5 million to establish a new scholarship fund.

The gift is notable for a school with a \$10 million endowment. University officials said it was one of the biggest gifts from nonalumni since the school's inception in 1865.

Mack, the chief executive officer of Morgan Stanley, became interested in the historically black college after working with Shaw President Clarence Newsome on the Duke University Board of Trustees, according to Newsome. Both men are former Duke University football players.

"I told him about the kind of students we have at Shaw and how deserv-

ing they are," Newsome said. "And at a certain point he expressed an interest in coming to the campus."

John and Christy Mack agreed to give the money after visiting Shaw last month and meeting students and professors, according to June Costa, the university's vice president for Institutional Advancement. Newsome said he thought it was the first time either of the Macks had set foot on the school's campus near downtown Raleigh.

Costa said the Macks met with a

variety of students, including ones who had "two jobs, spoke two languages and

[are] trying to stay in college." That may have resonated with John Mack, the son of a Mooresville grocery wholesaler who completed his final semesters at Duke by going to classes during his lunch breaks from a job clerking at a securities firm.

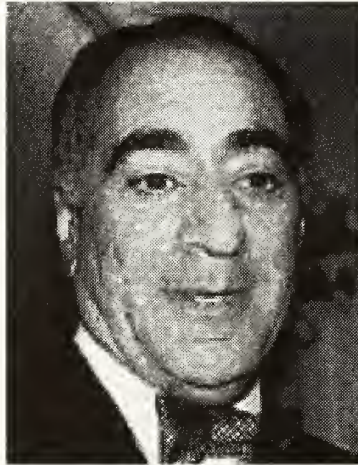
Mack could not be reached for comment Saturday.

In a prepared statement issued by Shaw, Mack said that he and his wife gave the money to help keep "education within reach." Mack's donation will

finance scholarships for students who show aptitude for science, technology, engineering or math and otherwise might not be able to afford college, according to the school. The first Christy and John Mack scholarships will be given to students entering Shaw in the fall, Costa said.

Shaw says the donation is one of the biggest from nonalumni since white Baptist missionary Henry Martin Tupper founded the school for freed slaves. Massachusetts textile manufacturer Elijah Shaw gave \$5,000 for its initial setup, and Vermont pipe organ maker Jacob Estey kicked in to pay for the first women's dorm.

The rank of the school's largest donor, however, still belongs to Shaw alumnus Willie E. Gary, a Florida-based trial lawyer who has given more than \$10 million to the school in recent years.

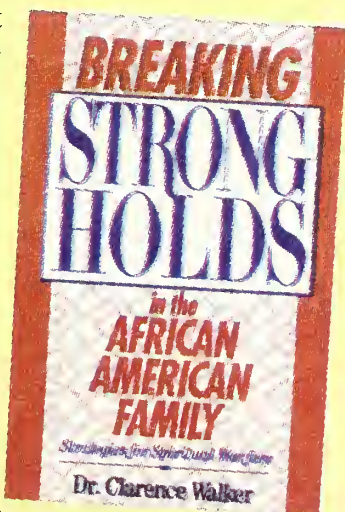
## Breaking Strongholds in the African-American Family

### RULES & PROCEDURES

The James F. Wertz Oratorical Contest is divided into several phases. The contest will begin at your local church and proceed to the District Level (Association) and end with a contest at the State level. The winner from the Senior Division ultimately goes to the National level.

• Contestants are representatives of Associations NOT Churches. Therefore, all contestants must be affiliated with an Association.

• The Association is allowed one (1) representative for each category.

### QUALIFICATION FOR CONTESTANTS

1. The contest is open to all young people grades 6th to 12th in the year that the contest is being held. Example: a contestant must be entering the 6th grade as of July 1, 2007. Seniors who are graduating from High School as of July 1, 2007 are not eligible.
2. Each contestant must present one typewritten (computer written) copy of their speech to the Director no later than the date specified on the application.
3. Students entering the contest that have been called into Ministry may participate with the understanding that their speech must be an oration, not a sermon or sermonette.
4. Other qualifications are governed by your local district.

### CONTEST RULES

1. All contestants must speak on the official topics presented for their category. Not speaking on an official topic will result in a penalty. The penalty is disqualification.
2. Each contestant shall prepare his or her own speech. However the contestant may receive advice in the preparation of the speech.
3. All contestants must state the official topic of their speech first. Failure to do so will result in a penalty. The penalty is 3 points.
4. The use of props, special costumes or clothing or the use of prompters will not be permitted. Bible, notes, papers or anything that can be construed as a prop will not be taken to the podium by the contestant. Penalty is disqualification.
5. No reference may be made that might identify the contestant, his or her family or the specific geographical or political area from which he/she originates. Maximum penalty may be 5 points as decided by the Judge.
6. The time allowed will not be over or under the specified length for each category. Should the time be over or under the length, a penalty of 5 points will be assessed.

7. Appropriate Dress is a must. Remember that you are being judged on your appearance as well as your overall presentation. Make a good first impression!

8. The Judges have the final decision over your presentation. (Not your coach, parents or your friends).

9. We try at all times to get three judges, however in the event one of the judges fails to show, we will continue the contest with the remaining judges. Our plans are to have three judges and one back-up.

### PENALTIES AND PENALTY EXPLANATIONS

The following penalties have been established to create an equitable opportunity for all contestants:

• **SELF IDENTIFICATION.** No oration or part of an oration may be used that positively identifies the contestant or identifies his or her specific geographical origin such as state or province or smaller geographical or political location (i.e. Pastor Smith, Calvary Chapel, school, parents name, etc.). Maximum penalty may be five (5) points as determined by the individual judge. This is a judgmental call based on the judge's interpretation.

• **TIME PENALTIES.** The time limit for orations shall not be under or over the time specified for the contestant's category.

◆ *Senior Division* – Four (4) minutes but no more than five (5) minutes are allowed for each contestant's oration. If the speech is LESS than four (4) minutes OR over five (5) minutes, the contestant will be penalized five (5) points.

◆ *Junior Division* – Four (4) minutes but no more than five (5) minutes are allowed for each contestant's oration. If the speech is LESS than four (4) minutes OR over five (5) minutes, the contestant will be penalized five (5) points.

◆ *Preparatory Division* – Three (3) minutes but no more than four (4) minutes are allowed for each contestant's oration. If the speech is LESS than three (3) minutes OR over four (4) minutes, the contestant will be penalized five (5) points.

■ **FAILURE TO ANNOUNCE SUBJECT/TOPIC AT THE BEGINNING.** All contestants must express the official title at the very beginning of his/her speech. The order of presentation is shown below:

- Subject/Topic (My topic is "Positive Thinking" or
- Positive Thinking
- Greetings
- Speech

*The penalty for failure to announce topic/subject at the beginning of the oration is three (3) points.*

■ **USE OF PROPS, CONSTUMES, ETC.** When the contestant leaves the preparation room for the auditorium, they are not allowed to have anything that would be construed as a prop. Props includes: The Bible, notes, note cards, and papers, folders, etc. The penalty is disqualification.

■ **NOT SPEAKING ON OFFICIAL TOPICS.** The Congress of Christian Education provides topics that are to be used in each category. These are the official topics for the contestants. Failure to speak on one of the official topics is disqualification. Topic must be in contestant's division.

■ **ORATIONS VS SERMONS.** The title implies that this is the James F. Wertz Oratorical Contest. Not the James F. Wertz Sermon Contest. Therefore, any speech presented as a Sermon is not acceptable. The penalty is disqualification. Judges will be instructed in this matter. There is a distinct distinction between the two, when delivered.

### GENERAL RULES

1. Spectators may not enter or leave the audience while a contestant is speaking. Please alert your congregation and friends to this fact if you are one of the contestants. This rule will be strictly adhered to; movement creates distraction for the contestant.
2. Please ensure that you have turned off all cellular phones and beepers.
3. Please refrain from opening mints or candy during a presentation.
4. Please do not applaud until all participants in each division has finished
5. Each contest shall have three judges and two timekeepers.
6. The judges cannot be acquainted with the contestants. (cont. next page)

7. The judges and timekeepers will not be identified at the time of the contest or by advance publicity. The judges will be identified only after the last oration has been presented for the category that they are judging or in the event the same judges are used throughout, they will be introduced after the last category
8. During the time of the contest, the judges and timekeepers shall each be in different locations within the room.
9. Each judge will render a final decision on all contestants without consultation with other judges or any other person. Each judge and timekeeper must sign his/her official score sheet.
10. At no time will a contestant or judge discuss the contestant's scores. The results of a judge's decision will be kept confidential.
11. The Judges will have a score sheet and a sheet for additional comments. The purpose of these comments is to help and or enhance the contestants in future endeavors.
12. Selection of winners will be based on the judge's score and any penalty points that the contestant may have received.
13. The Director and Assistant Director will conduct a drawing prior to the beginning of the contest, with all contestants present, for the speaking order.



Judges' Penalties)

### JUDGES PENALTIES

#### DQ - MEANS DISQUALIFICATION

• A Contestant will be disqualified in they use any props (i.e. Bibles, note cards, posters, prompting from anyone).

• A Contestant will be disqualified if they present a sermon. The distinction is clear. Contestants are to present speeches.

• A Contestant will be disqualified if they do not speak on the official topics. Each Division has specific topics that they are required to speak on. Any deviation from the topic is not the Official Topic.

#### SELF IDENTIFICATION

(1 – 5 POINTS)

• A Contestant who makes reference to their geographical location; their pastors, churches, associations, schools, etc will be deducted no less than 1 point and

no more than 5 points. The point spread is based on whether or not the identification was crucial. Please keep in mind that this is a Judge's Judgment call.

#### FAILURE TO ANNOUNCE SUBJECT AT THE BEGINNING OF ORATION (3 POINTS)

• A Contestant who fails to announce their topic at the beginning of the Oration. Examples of announcing subjects at the beginning of the Oration is: *My Topic Is; Today I will be speaking on or speaking to you on or; Just stating the Topic.* The purpose of stating the topic at the beginning is so that as a Judge you can readily identify what the Contestant is speaking on. They may state the Topic several other times within the speech; however, our position is that for your benefit it must be stated at the beginning.

#### SPEECH DELIVERY TIPS

- Make sure that your appearance is well presented

- Speak clearly, and adjust your

voice so that everyone can hear you. Don't shout for the sake of being loud

- It is common to speak rapidly when nervous, try to take your time speaking

- Effectively used, a pause in your speech can be used to emphasize a point, or to allow the audience to react to a fact, anecdote or joke

- Make eye contact with your audience. This helps to build trust and a relationship between the speaker and the listeners

- Do not fidget or make other nervous gestures with your hands. - Do not keep your hands in your pockets. Do use hand gestures effectively

- Be yourself; allow your own personality to come across in your speech

## Suggestions for Calling a Pastor

Contributed by Dr. Alvin Love, Pastor, Lilydale First Baptist Church, Chicago, IL

There are some churches which seldom call a pastor. The tendency among Baptist churches is to favor long pastorates. Most of the "splits," and the dissensions which are so frequent in local churches grow out of the results of "Calling a Pastor," and could be avoided by the attention to these essentials:

1. It is presupposed that our churches in their efforts to hold the young people and to interest the more intelligent will extend a call only to the best prepared man available, other things being equal.

2. The Pastoral Search Committee should secure the record of some good man whose private life and public reputation are of the best as laid down by the Scriptures, and invite him to preach before the church on a given Sunday. There is absolutely no need of having six or seven candidates for a "vacancy."

3. He should be given to understand in the beginning that if his record and qualities are satisfactory to the church, his services may be engaged as a pastor. An unknown candidate should be required to present letters

of recommendation from sources satisfactory to the church.

4. Whatever course of procedure is decided upon by the officers of the church and the Pastoral Search Committee, the matter should be submitted to the church and passed upon by it.

5. When the day is set for action for the calling of a pastor, a public notice stating the fact should be read~ at least three weeks before the date of the church ~Meeting at which the minister is to be called.

6. While a majority vote is sufficient to elect in all cases, it is nevertheless advisable that at least three-fourths of the votes of the active members of the church present should be in favor of the candidate.

7. When arrangements have been made as to the time of beginning the new pastorate, arrangements for his installation should also be made.

#### FINDING THE RIGHT PASTOR

How should a Church go about finding the "right" pastor? At the outset, the congregation must be prepared. Wise lay leaders will analyze the attitude of the church and deal with it appropriately.

Outside denominational help may be needed. At least five undesirable attitudes can hinder the process if they are not corrected.

#### AVOID THESE ATTITUDES

1. A mood of discouragement is often evident: a feeling that no one as competent as the former pastor can ever be secured.

2. A second troublesome attitude is that of either panic or impatience. The vacant pulpit seems to be a major calamity which must be solved with haste. If this attitude captures the congregation, they may call the first available preacher with disastrous results.

3. Sometimes a critical spirit prevails because of a feeling that the former pastor was inadequate. This may cause a congregation to judge all pastors harshly, especially if they have the same denominational or seminary background as the former pastor.

4. Closely akin to the critical spirit is the pride which insists that no one but a well-known and popular pastor should be considered. This, too, can lead to disappointment and even chastening by the Lord.

5. The fifth possible negative attitude is the pervading spirit which imagines that the financial situation

of the church can be strengthened by postponing the calling of a pastor. Money normally used to pay the pastor can now be used to pay bills, finance overdue repairs, or build a reserve in the treasury. This attitude is, of course, self-defeating.

#### HAVE AN EXPECTANT ATTITUDE

All of these attitudes must be replaced with an expectant spirit. The church must consistently remind itself that the sovereign Lord has chosen some special person to fill the vacancy. With this assurance the church can launch out and accept the challenge to discover God's will. The key to this discovery is the practice of believing prayer by the whole congregation. Every member of the church, every family, and every group should assign top priority to this prayer effort. By doing so, they will not only facilitate the pastoral selection process but will also generate a richer spiritual unity within the church.

#### DIRECT INITIATIVE

Before activating a pastoral search committee, however, the church should appoint a task force to conduct self-study. This task force may or may not be identical with the search committee. If it is not the same, then the search committee must have substantial input from the task force. The basic purpose of this self-

study is to identify the needs of the church. How else can a church intelligently seek a pastor to meet its needs? The results of this self-study will assist the search committee in finding a person whose particular gifts and abilities parallel the needs of the church. Seldom can a church adequately and objectively conduct this study without either denominational or professional assistance.

## APPOINT A PASTORAL SEARCH COMMITTEE

During the time the self-study is being made, the search committee should begin its preliminary work. The use of the term "search committee" rather than "pulpit committee" is important. The older term "pulpit committee" implies that the main concern is to fill the pulpit. The designation "search committee," on the other hand, embraces the committee's total responsibility, which is to locate an all-around pastor. An existing board should not act as the search committee. Instead, the congregation should carefully select a fresh representative committee.

Members of the committee should be selected primarily for their spiritual maturity, knowledge of the Word of God, and practical understanding both of the church generally and the local church in particular. A five-member committee constitutes a good working size. Three may be enough, while seven or nine should be adequate for even the largest church. A committee should never have an even number of members.

No search committee should agree to serve unless they are given:

1. A written description of their responsibilities.
2. A careful delineation of their authority.
3. A statement of the length of their appointment. A working budget for the committee must be determined. Less confusion results if the search committee is also responsible for providing pulpit supply and/or interim pastoral selection.

## APPOINTMENT OF AN INTERIM PASTOR

If an interim pastor is procured he should be appointed for a stated period of time, usually six months. The congregation should be notified that the interim pastor will not be considered as a candidate. Once an interim pastor has been appointed and the self-study is

completed, a pastoral job description must be written. Based on the primary needs of the Church as learned from the self-study, the qualifications for the new pastor can be outlined. A job description should accompany every request for the names of possible candidates and be made available to the congregation so that members can make suitable recommendations.

## THE PASTORAL SEARCH COMMITTEE

The primary purpose of the pastoral search committee is to find and recommend someone to serve as pastor. This committee, naturally, should seek God's leadership through the Holy Spirit to direct them in this responsibility. Some of the suggested duties are listed below:

1. Establish guidelines for the work of the committee. The guidelines for this committee should be established before the committee begins looking for a pastor. Several important considerations include

- What kind of pastor does the church need? Consider the following qualifications: age, health, education, special talents, experience in other churches, background.

- What is the candidate's attitude about church members, staff members, volunteer leaders, the denomination, worship design, Missions, Education, and Stewardship?

- What are the person's qualifications as a preacher? The committee should consider the candidate's: call; knowledge of the Bible; ability to communicate; feelings about the Bible's place in preaching, and responsible freedom from the pulpit.

- What does a church expect of its pastor? The committee should agree on what the church expects from its pastor. Discover church members' expectations on such areas as preaching, funerals, weddings, visitation, ministry to the sick and needy, special events, administration, evangelism, leadership, and being a visionary.

- What will the church do for the pastor? The committee should determine in advance what the church will do in terms of salary, benefits, continuing education, expenses for conventions, and retirement package.

- Where does the committee look for a pastor? The committee should discuss at this point where it will go for recommendations. The Moderator from their association or neighboring associations, denominational or state convention staff, other pastors, laypersons, and college and seminary professors are a

few examples of sources that committee members can contact for recommendations.

- How will the committee consider recommendations? The committee must decide how it will consider recommendations for persons. In most cases, resumes are submitted for prospective pastors. To maintain equality each person recommended should be asked to complete an application. The application should be the same for each applicant so all candidates answer the same questions and can be evaluated on the same criteria.

2. Gather information about prospective pastors. When the committee has established its guidelines, it should begin to interview potential candidates. The application information and references should provide adequate information in making a choice.

3. Visit a prospective pastor who is available. When the committee agrees that one person meets the qualifications, they should meet and visit that person's church or in a neutral site arranged prior to the time of the visit. The committee should decide as soon as possible whether to invite this prospective candidate to visit their church. If they are no longer interested in a candidate, they should notify him of this decision. When arranging for a prospective pastor to visit the church, the committee should decide the purpose of the visit. Is the candidate coming for an informational (further interviewing) visit or a visit to preach in view of a call?

4. Recommend a pastor to the church. If the committee has decided on a pastor, they should recommend the prospective pastor to the church. This recommendation should be made to the church in writing and should state all the facts concerning the pastor: qualifications, experience, the church's expectations of the prospective pastor, the church's commitment to the prospective pastor, and the salary and benefits package. The committee should notify the church when and where the recommendation will be made and when the prospective pastor is to preach for the church. In presenting the pastor to the church, the moderator should call for the vote in whatever manner the church agrees. The count of these votes should be reported to the prospective pastor.

5. Notify the pastor of the church's decision. As soon as the church makes a decision, the prospective pastor should be notified. After the prospective pastor has been notified, other prospective candidates who have been involved in the process should be notified that they are no longer being considered by the church.

When the new pastor arrives, the pastor search committee, the personnel committee, and deacons should help orient the pastor to the new congregation. Such a meeting can help make the new pastor's initial days effective, thus ensuring a long-term relationship.

## General Instructions for the Pastoral Search Committee

The primary purpose of the pastor search committee is to find and recommend someone to serve as pastor. Remember, you are not simply searching for a Preacher, but for a Pastor who can preach!

### A. Establish Guidelines for the Work

1. Survey Church to ascertain its needs regarding a Pastor.

2. Compilation of Church Information Packet.

3. Determine how the committee will consider recommendations.

4. Develop and distribute to each potential candidate, a "Pastoral Request for Information" form. This form will include the candidate's personal testimony, experience, education, family, philosophy of ministry, doctrinal beliefs, ordination, denominational preferences, viewpoints on current theological issues, names & addresses of (5) personal references.

5. Develop Voting Procedures.

### B. Evaluate Potential Candidates

1. Receive all resumes and information responses.

2. Verify information supplied.

3. Conduct interviews of prospective candidates.

4. Reduce list of potential candidates.

5. Arrange for Church visit of serious candidates.

### C. Recommend Possible Pastor

1. Make recommendation to Church in writing. This recommendation should include the potential Pastor's qualifications, experience, Church expectations and Church commitment (salary and benefits package).

2. Ask Joint Board to call Church Meeting for purpose of voting.

3. Notify Pastor of Church's decision. This should be done by certified mail.

### D. Orient the New Pastor

1. Handle moving arrangements, if necessary.

2. Finalize housing issues.

3. Provide a welcoming reception.

4. Make introductions to the community.

5. Plan and implement Installation Services.

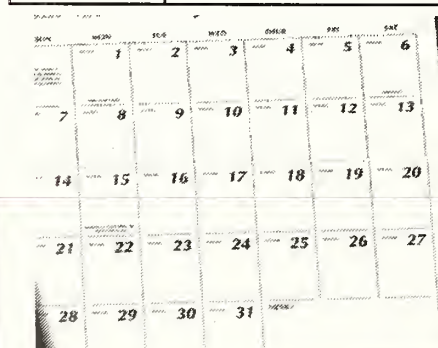

The Lenten season is now past and we are moving quickly toward Pentecost. In the interim, our Convention family will be quite busy with events that are designed to further enhance and strengthen GBSC disciples in efforts of Kingdom building.

Last month's Pastors' Conference sponsored by Shaw Divinity School was top notch and second to none. It featured a gathering of some of the nation's foremost clergy and presenters. Participants were exposed to cutting-edge information, presentations and strategies for ministry that can empower and impact the local church and community. We encourage those in attendance to digest and implement what you learned so others may be blessed and enlightened.

Using the conference as a platform, the Convention will spring into several major events during the month of April and continuing into May. The Laymen convened on April 13th and 14th in Fayetteville. The Woman's Convention convened in Charlotte for a Leader's Workshop on April 14th. As stated in my previous article, our Evangelism Conference will convene with the St. Matthews Baptist Church in Raleigh, North Carolina on April 24-26. Dr. Jerry Sanders, pastor of Fountain Baptist Church in Summit, New Jersey is the conference preacher. Again, we encourage each church to send representatives to the conference. Please prepare for serious study and the development of evangelistic strategies. Opportunities for hands on evangelism will be provided during the conference.

Our Mid-Year Session will be held in conjunction with the Ebenezer Missionary Baptist Association and Ellis Chapel Baptist Church in Shelby, North Carolina

on May 8th and 9th. This will be the first Mid-Year Session of my presidency. I have determined to present a challenging, informative and exciting agenda. It is my desire that participants receive valuable and relevant information that will be useable and helpful to their ministry.

The session will begin at 1:30 p.m. on May 8th with praise and worship followed by an overview of the aim, goal and purpose of the session. At 2:00 p.m., participants will have a choice of three seminars to attend. The Minister's Council will sponsor a seminar designed specifically for pastors and ministers. 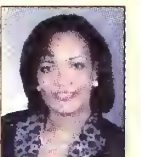

The story is told about a man who was walking down the street and pulling a chain behind him. Several individuals asked him why he was pulling the chain. He replied which an interesting question of his own: "Did you ever try to push one?" The idea of pushers and pullers has existed through the ages.

In Jesus' day, the Caesars, the centurions, and the religious leaders symbolized pushers who sought to destroy Jesus and push people against their will. When pushers spoke, people were expected to jump in submissive and oppressive obedience.

Jesus provided an insightful direc-

tive to the twelve original disciples in Matthew 20:25-26 (NIV): "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to be great among you must be your servant."

Walter Rauschenbusch (The Social Principles of Jesus) suggests that Jesus chose the kind of people he did to follow Him because Jesus wanted to influence the world with a new kind of leadership -- one that would serve and not exploit. Jesus sought people who would not be spoiled by success and poisoned by the possession of power. The search continues today!

According to Clarence Cranford (Taught by the Master), Jesus' idea of leadership clashed with the popular thought of that day. Many thought of leadership as climbing on top of people to gain position and power. Jesus' idea of leadership emphasized getting underneath people and their problems, and trying to lift them to a new life, a new hope, a new purpose, and a new fulfillment.

Jesus is our exemplary model: "...the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve" (Matthew 20:28,

NIV). Therefore, we must be servants of Christ in our homes, churches, to our communities, and the world. We have been saved in order to serve! We must serve with compassion, not confusion. We are equipped, enlightened, empowered, and endowed by the Holy Spirit to be:

## THE HISTORY OF THE BAPTIST INFORMER (65 YEARS OLD) February 1942-February 2007

The incorporation of the Baptist Sentinel Publishing Company is dated April 27, 1905. It remained as the official organ of the Convention. Taking over the paper in 1942, Reverend Otis Hairston was the editor for fourteen years. During his regime, the name of the paper was change from, the *Union Reformer* to the *Baptist Informer*. In an attempt to give North Carolina Baptists a more attractive publication with a name more meaningful the journal was changed to a 16-page magazine, and the name to Baptist Informer, February, 1942. Since 2005, Mrs. Portia H. Brandon, M. Div., serves as the Managing Editor.

## Tax Cut Makes Highly-Rated NC College Savings Plan Even Better

The North Carolina General Assembly has delivered some great news for every North Carolina family saving for college or thinking about it. Starting in 2006, most taxpayers who saved for college using North Carolina's 529-college savings plan can deduct the amount of their contributions from their taxable income.

For the 2006 tax-filing year, taxpayers filing individually can deduct contributions up to \$750, and couples filing jointly can deduct contributions up to \$1,500. This year, the 2007 deductible amount rises to \$2,000 for individuals and \$4,000 for couples filing jointly.

This tax cut makes North Carolina's National College Savings Program even better. North Carolina's 529-college savings plan has expanded from a single

investment option in 1998 to a wide range of choices today. There are options to meet the needs of every kind of investor. Most recently, the National College Savings Program added several Vanguard index funds to its options.

This is how it works: With a modest initial deposit, participants in the savings plan select their own investment options, and they don't pay enrollment fees or sales charges.

North Carolina's 529-college savings plan has drawn praise for its strong performance, low fees, wide array of investment options, and direct availability. But the missing piece was a state tax deduction. With the deduction now in place, even more families should consider North Carolina's National College Savings Program as they prepare to meet college costs for a child, grandchild, other relative, friend, or even themselves.

According to The College Board and Standard & Poor's, the projected average cost of a newborn's four-year

degree at a public college could total \$151,425. Keep in mind that there are other financial tools available at the federal level to help with this cost. Such as the Hope Scholarship Credit and the Lifetime Learning Credit. Be sure to ask your financial or tax advisor about these credits and whether or not you qualify.

In my opinion, a 529-college savings plan is the best way to save for college. In addition to the new state tax deduction, the earnings grow tax-free, and your withdrawals are tax-free when used for qualified higher education expenses. Expenses aren't limited to tuition, either -- they include books, fees, supplies and equipment, and room and board.

You can use the money you saved to pay for education expenses at public or private two-year or four-year colleges and universities inside North Carolina or out of state. If the beneficiary of the account gets a college scholarship or an appointment to a U.S. military academy, you can make withdrawals from the account up to the amount of the award.

And if the named beneficiary doesn't need all the money in the account, you can name a new one.

Unlike traditional custodial accounts established under UTMA (uniformed transfer to minor's act), where the child takes control of the money at age 18 or 21 depending upon state law, the 529 account is designed to let the account owner stay in control, no matter what the beneficiary's age is. As owner, you make all the decisions related to the account, including selecting the investment options, making withdrawals, and naming or changing the beneficiary.

I encourage every North Carolina family concerned about saving for college to consider opening a 529 account. 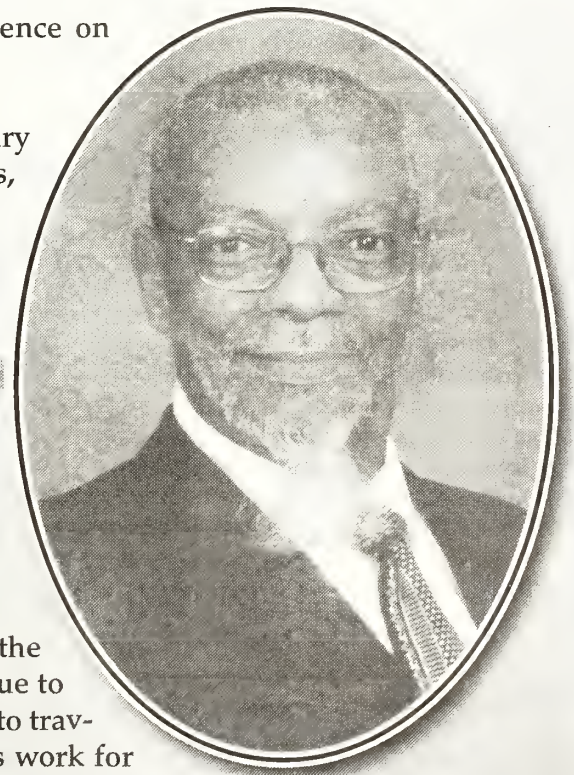
## Homegoing Service for Deacon Johnnie Gladden

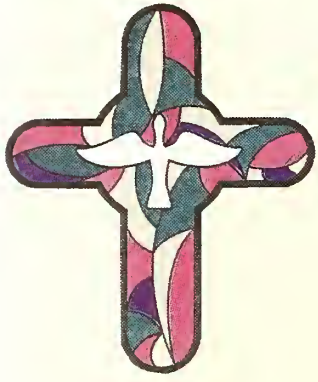
Mr. Johnnie Gladden, 81 of 5218 Dolphin Lane, Charlotte, died at his residence on Friday March 30, 2007.

### The History of THE WAKE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Wake Baptist Association was organized with Rev. George W. Harris Moderator, G. W. Freeman, Clerk.

"The promotion of the Kingdom of Christ," putting it in terse language, was the object of the Wake Baptist Association.

This the Association endeavored to accomplish from year to year by donating to State Missions, ministerial education, Foreign Missions, and aiding the weaker churches within its bounds. This Association has contributed larger sums to young men preparing themselves for the ministry than any other similar organization in the State. It was in the Wake Association that the Oxford Orphan Asylum was conceived. A committee was appointed to meet with others in Henderson, and as a result of this conference the Grant Colored Orphan Asylum was established. The Association has since felt a

peculiar responsibility toward the asylum, making annual contributions for its maintenance. The Association in 1908 had forty-three churches, forty-two ordained and twenty-seven licensed preachers; forty-three Sunday Schools, with six thousand one hundred and thirty members to the churches, and three thousand two hundred and twenty-six pupils in regular attendance in the Sunday Schools. Many of the churches of the Wake Association have B. Y. P. U. Societies. The Association loyally supports the Lott-Carey Convention and the Educational and Missionary Convention of North Carolina.

### The History of THE ROWAN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Rowan Baptist Association was organized in 1877 in a hospital at Salisbury, which was afterward purchased by the Baptists there and was organized as the Dixonville Baptist Church. Revs. Harry Cowan, Z. Horton and Cumbe Ellis were the ministers present in the organization. Rev. Harry Cowan was the first Moderator. There have presided over this body since: Revs. John Washington, Z. Horton, Gove Crowell, George Bowles, J. O. Crosby, P. S. Lewis, C. C. Somerville, C. L. Davis and G. W. Johnson.

There were three churches in the organization, and except the Dixonville, in the hospital as stated, the others worshiped under brush arbors. At the Association in Charlotte in 1908, there were sixty-five churches, with a membership of twelve thousand, and church edifices worth two hundred thousand dollars. Altogether the best edifices among the Baptists of North

Carolina were to be found in the bounds of the Rowan Association. This was said as well of the leaders. While there were many able preachers in other associations, there were more at that period in the Rowan than in any other. The school facilities were not equal by far; they had not the secondary schools as the others. At a time the Rowan Normal School was conducted by Dr. C. C. Somerville in Charlotte. While the Association made annual contributions to it, it was never adopted as the property of the Association.

When Dr. Somerville was called to Portsmouth the Salisbury people took the school there and conducted it, changing the name of it to the Piedmont Institute. The Association was liberal in its contributions to mission work and ministerial education.

It was from this Association the strongest support came to the General Baptist State Convention, especially in the early years of its history.

Indeed, the parable of the potter and the clay prophesies far beyond the times of Jeremiah more than 2500 years ago. It speaks to America (the United States) now.

In the latter part of the 600s BC, God called upon Jeremiah to speak truth to power in Judah, the Southern kingdom of Israel. (The Northern tribes of Israel were overrun and conquered about a century earlier. God severely criticized Judah's behavior and spoke of impending punishment against the nation. God used Jeremiah to warn the king and public officials, the priests and the religious establishment, and the false prophets—who said what the people and king wanted to hear (4:9; 8:8-9). Jeremiah was not afraid to give unpopular criticism. He was

labeled a betrayer of the nation, when in fact he was called by God to challenge Judah to repent and be saved from catastrophe. The people refused and years later fell into Babylonian captivity. Jeremiah suffered from the national disobedience (8:20-9:2) as did all citizens of Judah. How many Christians today hesitate to speak out against unwise national public policies for fear of being labeled unpatriotic?

### America Must Repent

Many U.S. citizens have questioned this war from the beginning. Yet, we collectively suffer from our nation's sins and shame around the world. For this we all must repent! We must stand up like Jeremiah and let our voices of protest be heard more vigorously! Repentance means to turn. America must continue to turn from an ill-founded war and seek God's will (and direction) to end the conflict.

Jesus once said: "...unless you repent you will all likewise perish." Luke 13:3 NKJV

Sample Congregational Sentence Prayers for A Sunday of Repentance & Prayer on Iraq

#1 – Peace Activists: Lord, we collectively suffer from our nation's sins and share in America's shame around the world because of the war in Iraq. For this, we all must repent! Repentance means to turn, and America must continue from this war and rely on God to lead us to peace.

#2 – Women's Ministry: Lord, forgive the United States of America for rushing into the war in Iraq without compelling reasons and for the deception and untruths told by our national leaders. Please forgive us Lord for dishonoring Your holy name.

#3 – Girl and Boy Scouts: Lord, forgive us for the terrible death toll and suffering in Iraq. Forgive us for the deaths of thousands of children and tens of thousands of adults. Forgive us for the families torn apart and for parents, children and relatives who mourn. We sorrow for the girls and boys who may never know scouting or the joy of its fellowship.

#4 – Hospitality Team: Lord, forgive other nations for inciting and stirring up their citizens to war. Turn all nations from war and terror to faith and hope in God. Let hospitality reign in us!

#5 – Senior Citizens: Lord, forgive us for all the senior citizens who have suffered from this war. Help those who are in their 70s and 80s and 90s who need peace in their golden years, yet cannot find it. Bless the elderly who have had to flee their homes and others who are afraid to go outside and walk the streets or to go buy food. Bring Your peace to their lives.

#6 – Health Care Team: Lord, forgive our nation for being ill-prepared to

heal and care for our injured and wounded. O, Lord, please bring physical and spiritual healing here at home and to the people of Iraq.

#7 – Loyal Workers or Pastor's Aid: Lord, forgive us for having taken so many men and women from their jobs to fight a war. Many were loyal to their jobs and families. Keep them safe and return them home to us. We pray especially for \_\_\_\_\_ (names) from our church who have been called up to serve in Iraq.

#8 – Sunday School: Lord, forgive us for the many scars our soldiers bear from fighting far from home; for the deeply painful memories of killings and lost friends. These things pound in many of their heads and hurt for years to come. Forgive us for the hardships to their families.

#9 – Evangelism Team: Lord, forgive us as human beings for lacking the faith to resolve problems without violence. Help us remember that you said: "Vengeance is Mine." Give us, Lord, the wisdom of Your Spirit in times of trouble.

#10 – Trustees: Lord, we pray that you forgive us for the millions of dollars of property and infrastructure damage in Iraq. We lost the Twin Towers; Iraq has lost cities. Help us to be better stewards and trustees of our world's resources and treasures.

#11- Music Ministry: Lord, forgive us for the poverty, ethnic, racial and religious issues that often lie behind wars. Help all people learn to "beat swords into plowshares and spears into pruning hooks." Please, Lord, return the joy of singing and music to the people of Iraq our soldiers' homes.

#12- Laymen: Lord, forgive our world for spending more than \$1 trillion on defense in 2006. Military spending cost \$173 per person in the world today, a surge in spending if 25% over the past five years. Please help nations resolve the estimated 34 armed conflicts in the world today, costing more than 1,000 deaths.

#13- Associate Ministers: Lord, forgive our nation for waiting so long to urge that our troops come home. Forgive us for so slowly demanding that Congress-Republicans, Democrats and Independents-stop the slaughter in Iraq.

#14- Floral Group: O, Lord, let the beauty of your world return to bloom in the cities and upon the landscapes of Iraq. Let flowers bloom and gardens flourish and crops grow. Let city markets return to normal and the fruit of Your Spirit bless the land. Please Lord, let flowers adorn houses and not caskets.

#15- Missionaries: Lord, forgive us for spending nearly half a trillion dollars on the Iraq war. This money robs poor, hungry, weak and needy people of vital resources in America and around the world. We pray for poor people, widow-

ers and orphans who cry out for help.

#16- Youth Ministry: Lord, children around the world die because they don't have medicines for curable health problems. Children and parents are dying as refugees fleeing war-torn countries. People are hungry and hopeless. Lord, please guide our national leaders in Congress not to cut funds for world child survival accounts, to development assistance worldwide, to global disaster relief and famine aid, and for refugee assistance.

#17- Prayer Team: Lord, forgive the church in America for being too silent in the face of our nation's ill-founded aggression in Iraq. Forgive U.S. faith communities who have helped to prosecute the war by the curse of silence.

#18- Outreach and Care Team: Now, Lord, remold and remake our nation into a new vessel that please You. Regenerate, cleanse and purify our hearts and minds to treat our global neighbors with truth, fairness, justice and respect. In-as-much as we do it to the least of these our brothers and sisters, we do it also unto You.

#19- Deaconesses: Lord, place your hands upon the soul of the United States of America. You are Sovereign! Have mercy upon us! By Your hands help us make better decisions in domestic and international affairs. Give us hope, O, Lord, for our hope is built on nothing less than Jesus blood and righteousness!

#20 – Ministers Spouses: Have Your own way, Lord, have Your own way – You are the Potter, we are the clay Mold us and make us, after Your will – While we are waiting, yielded and still

#21 – Pastor: In the words of St. Francis of Assisi, "Lord, make me an instrument of your peace.... Where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy." Lord, we pray for peace in Your Holy Name.

(2 Corinthians 2:10) In repenting, let us continually offer up prayers to Almighty God until this war has ended. Friendship Baptist Church has been reaching out to the children of the incarcerated for over twelve years. This ministry is presently led by Deborah McLendon and supported by many volunteers from the church who provide support in many areas. This ministry is called Angel Tree and was first started by a women named Mary K. Beard (a former inmate) who returned to society and was working with Prison Fellowship Ministries. Prison Fellowship adopted the Angel Tree ministry and it has now become one of the major ministries to the children of inmates in the world. Prison Fellowship Ministries was started by Charles Colson (former inmate) who served in the White House with President Richard Nixon. The Angel Tree ministry began as an effort to provide gifts on behalf of the incarcerated parent at Christmas, but has now expanded to a year round ministry that includes camping and mentoring through out the year. Statistics reveal that the children of inmates a more likely to follow their parents into a life a crime. It is through this effort by Friendship Baptist Church that makes the word "missionary" a reality in this congregation. Friendship church is overcoming evil with good in the lives of these kids and preventing the spread of crime.

Angel Tree Coordinator Deborah McLendon shared how this ministry is supported by over 30 church volunteers. Over the past 5 years, Friendship has served more than 5000 children through their Angel Tree ministry. Just last year,

their efforts were recognized by Prison Fellowship Ministries as a leading Angel Tree church in the state of North Carolina. One special aspect of the Angel Tree ministry at Friendship is the Christmas Worship Service where the children of inmates come to the church and are able to have fellowship, love, a wonderful meal, and receive their gifts on behalf of their incarcerated parent. Sister McLendon shared how this spe-

cial service is now highly anticipated every year and has been instrumental in the children hearing the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Join me in praising God for the Friendship Missionary Baptist Church for their tenured efforts in reaching out to the children of inmates. This preventive ministry has led to many children not resorting to crime, but choosing to live for Christ who they have come to know through a Church that is over-

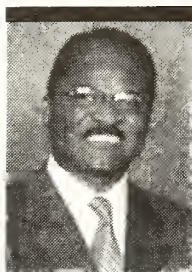

## On African American Men

It was my good fortune on March 16th to visit the Northampton County Association in session at Rich Square. The Moderator, Rev. Robert Sessoms, and his assistant, Rev. Tony flood, delivered messages of hope focused on the need to enable parents to nurture and raise children able to carry on the traditions of faith, decency and service essential to safe caring and supportive neighborhoods. These clergy persons practice what they preach by sponsoring maternal and child health advocacy and encouraging fatherhood role and respon-

sibility to men who need help in their understandings and action toward their children and the mothers of their children. Mrs. Larree Cherry is coordinator of the Healthy Beginnings Program in Northampton County.

The health and welfare of the African American community is compromised because of the failure of many men to strive. The North Carolina Man Power Development Commission predicts that by 2020 forty percent of African American men will not complete high school and of that number thirty percent will go to prison. The consequences are known to result in even fewer marriages as women resist marriage to men unable to help their situations. Behaviors and values acquired in prison are carried into our neighborhoods. This includes redefinition of sexual norms and acceleration of the spread of HIV/AIDS into the female popula-

tion. Many boys adopt prison dress and prison values.

Failure in School has too often proven the first step toward prison. African American youth especially boys are 4 to 5 times more likely to be expelled for misconduct than white boys. Youth who are expelled fall further behind and drop out to the streets. The streets provide the stepping stone to first detention.

It is worth noting that America has the highest percentage of its citizens in jail than any other modern democratic society. We elect people to public office based on their promise to reduce crime. African American people are about 12% of the total population but make up over 50% of those in jail. Half of those executed are African American.

*Many forces contribute to the problem.*


1) Historical racism has contributed to

the selection of African American men as victims. We are more likely to be stopped, more likely to be found guilty, and more likely to go to jail than white men under similar circumstances.

2) Economic decline in heavy industry during the 1960's and 1970's disproportionately displaced African American men from good paying jobs.

3) Industrialization of farms led to massive dislocation of African American families engaged in family farming.

4) Very large numbers of those jailed are not a threat to public safety. They become tangled in a web of fear and judicial injustice well suited to the production of failed manhood. All to the detriment of African American communities.

## NC Council of Churches Smoke-Free Sabbath Memorial Day Sunday, May 27, 2007

As you probably know, an increasing weight of evidence, including now the strong statement of the current Surgeon General, points to the health consequences of secondhand smoke (the smoke we nonsmokers inhale because someone else around us has chosen to smoke). That evidence now includes the fact that as little as thirty minutes of exposure can trigger a heart attack in someone with heart disease or risk factors for heart disease.

In 2005, the Executive Board of the NC Council of Churches adopted the attached statement on Health and Secondhand Smoke.

Now we are encouraging congregations across the state to take part in Smoke-Free Sabbath, which is being promoted by the NC Alliance for Health, using materials adapted from

the General Baptist State Convention (a member of the NC Council of Churches). The suggested date is Memorial Day Sunday, May 27, because this ties in with a wider effort regarding the health risks of tobacco use. But if that date doesn't work on

your church calendar, I encourage you to find another date that would work. The important thing is for congregations across the state to help raise awareness of the health risks from secondhand smoke and to take steps to eliminate those risks.

## Sanders Selected As Evangelism Conference Preacher

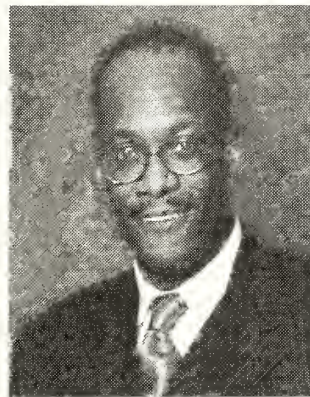

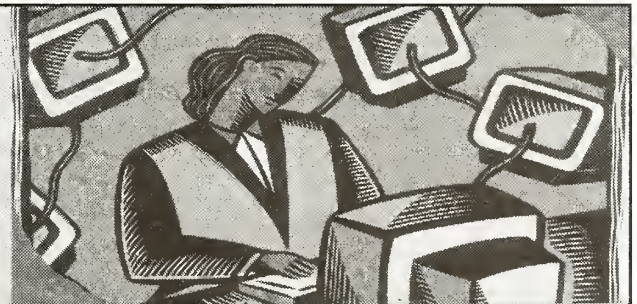

### “To Convince the Unconvinced to be Convinced...through Education, Missions and Fellowship,” Matthew 28:19-20

Last month the Mid-Year session convened in Shelby, North Carolina with the Ebenezer Association and Ellis Chapel Church. We are indebted to pastor Ray Lockhart of the Ellis Chapel Church and moderator William Thompson, along with their fine people,

for the warm hospitality and welcoming spirit afforded us during our visit.

In an attempt to bring about “fresh water”, a few changes were made to the session. I believe one of the most pre-

vious gifts God has given to humankind is our time. Therefore, the decision was made to change the session from three days to two days. The session opened on Tuesday afternoon and adjourned early Wednesday afternoon. Each session began on time and every attempt was made to end on time. We intend to respect your time.

Our program was second to none! We were blessed with tremendous, prepared presenters and participants. Special thanks to Dr. Gardner C. Taylor, Reverend Sheldon Daniels, Dr. Casey Kimbrough, Dr. Lafayette Maxwell, Dr. Peter Wherry, Reverend D. K. Ferguson, Reverend Wesley McLaughlin, Reverend Charles Webber, Reverend Ryan McCain, Dr. Thomas Walker, Dr. Valencia Covington and William Cheek for pouring into our spirits. The information was enlightening, relative and inspirational.

I want to share with our beloved General Baptist Family a matter of immense importance that is crucial to the mission and ministry of our convention. Through the years, the convention

survived many challenges and spoke to the ills and issues of its time. As we transition to another era in our storied faith journey, we too are charged to meet new challenges. One such challenge is to understand and address our contributions to State Missions and, in particular, our operations. The other is to enhance confidence in our ability to do ministry and be accountable.

Traveling the state and interacting with pastors, leaders and disciples of the churches has shown that there needs to be clarity about State Missions. State Missions dollars sent to the Parent Body fund the programs of the convention and our auxiliaries (excluding the Woman's Convention), banquets, convention sessions and any other special programs. State Missions also fund the operations of the convention, i.e. ...administration (supplies, equipment, insurance, mailings, telephone), personnel, building and maintenance. Approximately 16% of our churches support the convention and it's objectives through the unified program. The other 84% send designated monies to both State Missions and objectives.

In the realm of accountability, since 2005 objectives have received almost 1 million dollars of support through the convention. Contributions to objectives are sent at the end of the month-ON A TIMELY BASIS. You can rest assured the monies you send are being distributed according to your wishes. However, because many of our churches give inconsistently (or not at all to State Missions), we constantly face shortfalls during the year. During the Mid-Year session, EST Haywood Gray shared a revealing analogy. When asked how the convention was doing financially, Dr. Gray replied, “We have patched the holes in our ship. We are not sinking, but we are not moving forward”. In other words, if we are to move our convention to realize enhanced education, ministry and missions, we must provide fuel for the

ship's motor.

It is not a difficult task to achieve and I offer a strategy to address the same. EST Gray unveiled a beautiful and simplistic option called “The 750 Plan”. The 750 Plan consists of 750 churches giving a minimum of \$1,300.00 per year or approximately \$108.00 per month designated for State Missions (or operations). This plan is doable, fair and reasonable for most of our member churches. These gifts given on a consistent (monthly) basis will allow the headquarters to focus on the implementation of the convention's ministries and missions; and to move along side its associations and member churches with the support they need to be faithful to their calling. The key is being consistent and intentional in giving to our operations (State Missions). Of course, to whom much is given, much is required. Those who can afford more, do more. God knows your heart.

I am asking all General Board/Executive Committee members and convention leaders to take seriously our plight and join me in addressing the operations challenge. I believe one cannot lead effectively from the rear. This administration (president, vice-presidents and officers) intend to lead by example. In the coming weeks we, along with other leaders and volunteers, are preparing to take this conversation on the road. We will visit local pastors and leaders, building relationships, addressing needs and presenting The 750 Plan.

Along the same lines, it is wisdom to encourage and deepen our relationships with our corporate partners, i.e. ...North Carolina Mutual, Providence Group, Mechanics and Farmers and MMBB. Building mutual relationships that are advantageous to our convention is a priority and will prove valuable to our ministry and mission.

Our convention is abundantly blessed

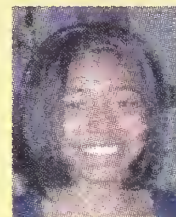

Missions expenses fall into two categories: OPERATIONS AND PROGRAMMING.

## Health and Wellness Workshop Sets Tone for Mid-year Session

The General Baptist State Convention held its mid-year session at Ellis Chapel Baptist Church in Patterson Springs near Shelby, NC. Walker. "Walk Away the Pounds", another initiative, is a light impact aerobics program designed to help you gradually improve your stamina, help you lose weight and reduce your risk of chronic diseases. "First Friday" a musical showcase of talent, "Food of the Week" profile, "Youth in Motion" and "Healthy Meals" are other initiatives of the Jericho Project.

Dr. Walker states that the most exciting initiative of EBC-Atom how-

ever, is "Mama Why" the gospel play that focuses on a family dealing with many of the pressures of today's society and how a spiritual mother prays to hold them together. This play features Dr. Walker singing "One Day at a Time" and other nationally known recording artist. The purpose of the play is to raise funds for local churches to start health and wellness programs. This play has been sponsored by the NC Office of Minority Health and Health Disparities. ## Grace and Peace: "Let It Go"

Every serious disciple of Jesus Christ desires to attain to spiritual maturity, of this there should be no argument. Many faithful disciples spend their entire lifetime striving to

reach an ever-higher level of maturity, and even babes in Christ have that fervor that drives them to not remain babes but to somehow find the secret of how to "grow in the grace and knowledge" of their Savior, Jesus Christ (II Peter 3:18). Many books have been written to help disciples grow up and into the faith, but we need look no further than God's written word for the way to reaching that elusive goal.

Realizing We Have Not Yet Attained. (Phillipians 3:12-13) The mature disciple exhibits the marks of maturity when he realizes he has a long way to go yet, for the ultimate goal is to be like the Master! Paul once said to the Corinthian brethren, "Imitate me, just as I also imitate

Christ" (I Corinthians 11:1). In effect, Paul was saying, "Come follow me because I'm trying to catch up with Jesus, and He's way ahead of us!" The goal of every disciple is to be like the Master (Matthew 10:25), and Jesus Himself put certain offices within the church to help us eventually come "to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ" (Ephesians 4:12-13). In other words: that we might be like Him!

**Forgets The Past.** (Phillipians 3:13) The mature disciple also is one who does not dwell on the past — good or bad. He realizes that, in the

past, he was a sinner — guilty of transgressing the will of God (Rom. 3:23) and guilty of the blood of Christ (Galatians 2:20). He could look back on this and wallow in self-pity and

remorse, but he knows that he is now forgiven! Instead of dwelling on how bad he was at one time, the mature disciple focuses now on what he has become, through the power of Christ (Phillipians 4:13).

**Reaches for the Future.** (Phillipians 3:13) The mature disciple

is one who, of necessity, has a deep understanding of God's word but who, at the same time, is striving to always know more and to understand it better. He is "diligent" to present himself approved to God and rightly divides the word (II Timothy 2:15), and

knows that constant study is the only way to ensure that continues to be the case. Laziness regarding God's word is simply not even considered! He knows that the future will bring more

(I Thessalonians. 4:1, 10).

challenges, more temptations, and more trials, and an even deeper knowledge of God's word is necessary. He knows he must have the desire as a babe for the "pure milk of the word" (I Peter 2:2), but knows he cannot feast on milk for long before moving onto the meat (Hebrews 5:14).

**Presses Toward the Goal.** (Phillipians 3:14) Here is often the most distinctive mark of the mature disciple: he has a goal! And not only does he have a goal, everyone else knows it, too! So much a part of his life is this goal that it will be evident to all because he desires it so strongly. The mature disciple does not hide the fact that he is a disciple, but gladly shares his goal with others in the hopes that it will be their goal, too. He forgoes the chase for the pleasures of the flesh and the everyday distractions the world throws at him, and has his mind "on things above, not on things on the earth" (Colossians 3:2). He "diligently seeks" God because he knows there is a reward (Hebrews 11:6), and is constantly seeking to "excel still more" though he is already mature in many spiritual things (I Thessalonians. 4:1, 10).

## Overcoming Evil With Good By "Making Disciples" Inside Prison Walls

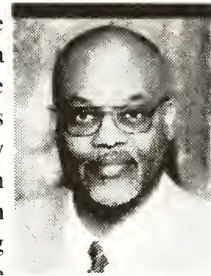

I have been serving in prisons since 1979. In every prison I have been in throughout this country, I can testify that Jesus Christ has been present. As I became more involved in prison ministry, the Holy Spirit began to help me understand more fully what Jesus meant when he gave the Great Commission.

Part of the Great Commission says, "Go into all the world and make disciples." I came to understand the Great Commission did not leave out persons who were in prison. I realized that a person's circumstances (even incarceration) cannot stop the Lord's desire to "make disciples of all nations". Now that I have been serving as a Chaplain/Pastor in the prison setting for over 20 years, I can testify as an eyewitness and active participant to the Lord

"making disciples" inside prison walls. The Bible teaches that the Lord is no respecter of persons. This means He will use a person in prison to do his will just like He can use anybody else. Remember Joseph, Samson, and the Apostles Paul and John. They all experienced incarceration (not for crimes), but none the less were used mightily inside the prison walls. Today our nation leads the world in the numbers of person who are incarcerated in state and federal pris-

ons (over 2 million). This mission field for the most part continues to be neglected by a large part of the Church. I guess many don't truly believe God can overcome evil with good by making disciples inside prison walls. Many in the Church still only have a "stained glass window" understanding of where and how God is building His Church. Well let me help you get a Christian worldview of what the Lord is doing inside prison walls!

The prison setting cannot hinder the Holy Spirit's work no more than the most crime invested part of a city can. What hinders the Holy Spirit's work are Christians who do not live from a Christian worldview. Too many of us simply live with an infantile understanding of the Church and missions that is centered on what happens within the physical building you go to each Sunday. I declare to you it is time to grow up and move out onto the mission field of In-Prison ministry where the Great Commission is being fulfilled inside prison walls. The Anti-Crime and Incarceration Ministry is seeking to train churches to "make disciples" inside prison walls. Most volunteers think the main type of in-prison ministry is going inside and holding an hour worship service. I want you to know it is more effective to disciple the person in prison than to think having a hour long worship service is enough. Presently, I have established Schools of Discipleship at two major prisons in our state. These Schools of Discipleship seek to disciple the Christians in the prison to grow and carry out the Church's mission inside prison walls. AND IT IS WORKING! I want to encourage every GBSC association to see if the prison in your area needs a School of Discipleship established inside the prison. If so, let AIM equip you to move to another level of in-prison ministry where we can overcome evil with good by making disciples inside prison walls to reach, reconcile, and restore other prisoners.

The GBSC Anti-Crime & Incarceration Ministry needs our churches to get involved now!

# God Seeks Bold Prophetic Witnesses on Iraq

Like many other people, I opposed the war in Iraq before it began. I was distressed over our aggression there even as war loomed upon our nation's horizon like dark clouds in the distance. Like some preachers, I warned our church about the wickedness of bombing Iraq.

Since those tragic beginnings of war in Iraq in 2003, I have been called upon twice to speak at peace rallies in Fayetteville against U.S. actions in Iraq. But it was a phone call to my home in late 2006 that spurred me to become even more vocal on this issue.

The call came about 11:30 p.m. one night. Such late calls usually signal trouble to a pastor. A woman from the church, who has a keen gift for spiritual discernment, was on the line and was deeply depressed over events in Iraq. She went on to say that the Lord and stirred her to "speak out" against the war whenever and wherever she could.

God touched my heart that night and wrestled with my spirit for several days, calling upon me to more boldly speak out against the war and to call our nation to pray for repentance of sins in Iraq and for the Almighty to bring peace to Iraq.

Last month, during its Mid-Year Session, the General Baptist State Convention of N.C. Inc., approved a statement calling on Missionary Baptist Churches to pray for the forgiveness of our nation's sins in Iraq and for peace in that region of the world. By doing this, the Convention officially responded to God's call for a bold prophetic witness on the crisis in Iraq.

Indeed, pastors and churches must lead the resistance to this unjust and immoral war. The church must prophetically bear witness against the arrogance of U.S. foreign policies that place armed aggression above diplomacy and initiate wars based on lies and deceptions. We must remind ourselves that as a nation we cannot succumb to evils greater than those of adversaries. We cannot deny human rights to detainees at Guantanamo Bay and support torture of prisoners and

call ourselves the "land of the free." We cannot ignore the rules of the Geneva Convention, usurp privacy rights illegally and invade countries without just cause and still lead the "free world."

Jesus boldly faced the evil powers of His day, and we must follow suit! We know that Jesus died that our sins might be forgiven.

His death was executed by spiritual wickedness that head infiltrated into the high places powers of His society. Jesus went to the capital city of his country and confronted

Roman imperial power and the Jewish religious power structure. He was

viewed as a political, social and religious threat to these earthly leaders. Yet, he challenged their sins and proclaimed the Kingdom of God widely.

Many people today continue to be afraid to speak out against our national sins in Iraq, but pastors and churches cannot and must not duck the issue. Like the prophet Daniel, we must throw open our windows and pray that the mighty hand of God will restore sanity to our nation and grant peace to Iraq. The Christian church must not lose sight of the fact that we have a great prophetic tradition. We must not overlook systems that dehumanize and destroy peoples' lives.

Dr. James Forbes, former pastor of the Riverside Church in New York, told Shaw Divinity School Pastor Conference attendees last March that "When God gets mad, He calls Him a prophet! The prophet stands for God and says what God says. The prophet must see divine light," he said. "He must see what others cannot see."

We were reminded by other presenters that prophetic preaching and witnessing proclaims God's justice and righteousness. It challenges corrupt practices and relates Scriptures to unjust social conditions. Prophetic preaching is divinely inspired and points out corrupt practices and social conditions, especially those that oppress poor and vulnerable people. Indeed, prophetic witness speaks truth to the powerful and to the powerless.

So while we pray continually for our men and women in uniform and

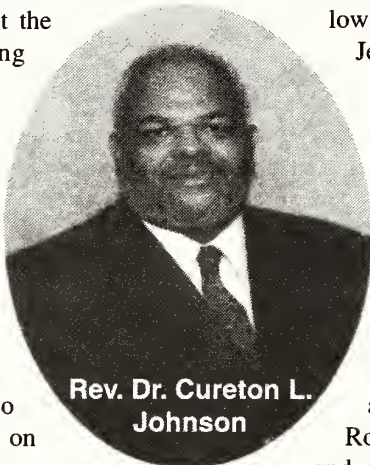
for their return home soon, let us not forget to pray for the millions of lives that have been disrupted in Iraq by our nation's wicked aggression. An estimate one million Iraqis are refugees in Syria and about another million have fled to Jordan. Many are dying in refugee camps, in addition to the estimated 100,000 men, women, and children who have died since the war began in 2003.

Let us remember the words of Scripture: "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land." (II Chronicles 7:14) There is no better time to put these words into action!

So let us offer our prayers on Sunday, July 1, as a National Day of Repentance and Prayer on Iraq. Hold your service on the Wednesday evening proceeding the fourth of July (June 27), if Sunday is not suitable, or use any date that fits your church calendar.

1. **What is *Campaign 750*?** Campaign 750 is an effort to have 750 Churches agree to give \$100.00 each month designated for State Missions. The second part of the Campaign is to identify three (3) persons in each of the 750 Churches who will give \$10.00 each month designated for State Missions.
2. **Does my Church have to give every month?** Yes. In order for the Campaign to be successful and the necessary funds raised, each Church that enrolls will be expected to contribute each month.
3. **When are funds due?** *Campaign 750* funds are due by the **tenth day of each month**. Please be sure that your financial staff mails your check in sufficient time to be received at the Baptist Headquarters by the **tenth day of the each month**.
4. **Does our Church need a special form?** No. All your Church needs to do is to make a note on the check for *Campaign 750* and the proper accounting of your funds will be noted.
5. **May we send our contributions for missions and objectives in the same check as *Campaign 750*?** PLEASE DO NOT. Please send a separate check for *Campaign 750*. Your funds will be deposited into a restricted account separate from the account where other monies are deposited.
6. **Can my Church pay up ahead of time?** If your Church wishes to send its funds in advance (for example, \$300.00 for a quarter), it may do so. However, Churches are encouraged to send the funds monthly.
7. **Why is it important to send the funds monthly?** By sending funds monthly, we are much better able to budget for the Convention's expenses. We can project what we will receive each month and plan to pay the Convention's bills which are received each month.
8. **May a Church send more than \$100.00 a month?** Most certainly. The \$100.00 is the minimum amount requested. This amounts to \$25.00 a Sunday for those Churches with services every Sunday. (It's only \$12.50 a service if your Church has two services on Sunday.) Some Churches will decide to send more when thinking of their resources and blessings.
9. **What about our Church's contributions to the other objectives?** Your Church is still expected to contribute regularly to support the objectives of the Convention. The Campaign 750 donation is above and beyond what your Church is currently sending. If your Church is not supporting the Convention, Campaign 750 gives your Church a good starting point.
10. **How should we find individuals in our Church to contribute?** Whatever method you use is fine. You may solicit three people to give for an entire year. You may solicit three different people each month.

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS about Campaign 750

11. **How should the funds collected from individuals be sent in?** Our preference would be that the Church collect the funds and send them along with the Church's funds once a month. However, if the individuals choose to send their contributions directly to us, please be sure that they indicate *Campaign 750* on their check as well as give the name of your Church.
12. **What will be done with the funds when we send them in?** *Campaign 750* funds will be deposited directly into a restricted account. As the Convention has needs to use the funds sent, money will be transferred from the restricted account. By handling the funds this way, the Headquarters will be best able to account for all contributions received.
13. **What will the funds be used for?** First, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for OPERATIONS expenses. Secondly, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for PROGRAMMING expenses. Finally, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for CONVENTION DEBT TO VENDORS.
14. **How long will it take to pay off the Convention's debt?** Along with other strategies to retire our debt, it is estimated that the Convention's debt could be settled in twenty-seven (27) months if *Campaign 750* is fully implemented.
15. **What will happen once the debt to vendors is paid?** The Convention will then apply funds from *Campaign 750* to pay funds due to the objectives from previous fiscal years.
16. **What happens once the funds due to objectives is paid?** Once the Convention has met all of its debt obligations (both to vendors and to the objectives), the funds from *Campaign 750* will be used to expand the Convention's programming and services.
17. **Will we stop enrolling Churches once 750 have enrolled?** Certainly not. We would like to see every General Baptist Church participate. 750 is a goal to work toward. We hope to exceed this goal.
18. **Could an Association or an Association Auxiliary enroll?** Yes. We would welcome the support from local Associations or Auxiliaries of Associations.
19. **What if our Church loses track of our contributions?** Not a problem. You will receive a receipt and the Baptist Headquarters will be able to provide a statement of your contributions upon request.
20. **Can our Church designate where we want *Campaign 750* funds applied?** No. If you wish to make a contribution for a certain reason, please do not label your funds *Campaign 750*. Funds for *Campaign 750* will be used according to the greatest immediate need: either operations, programming, or debt reduction. You may always send a designated contribution which will be applied according to your instructions.

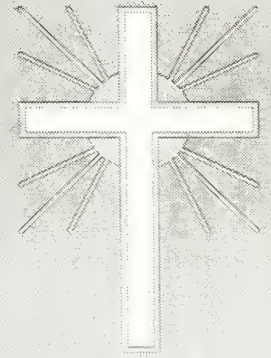

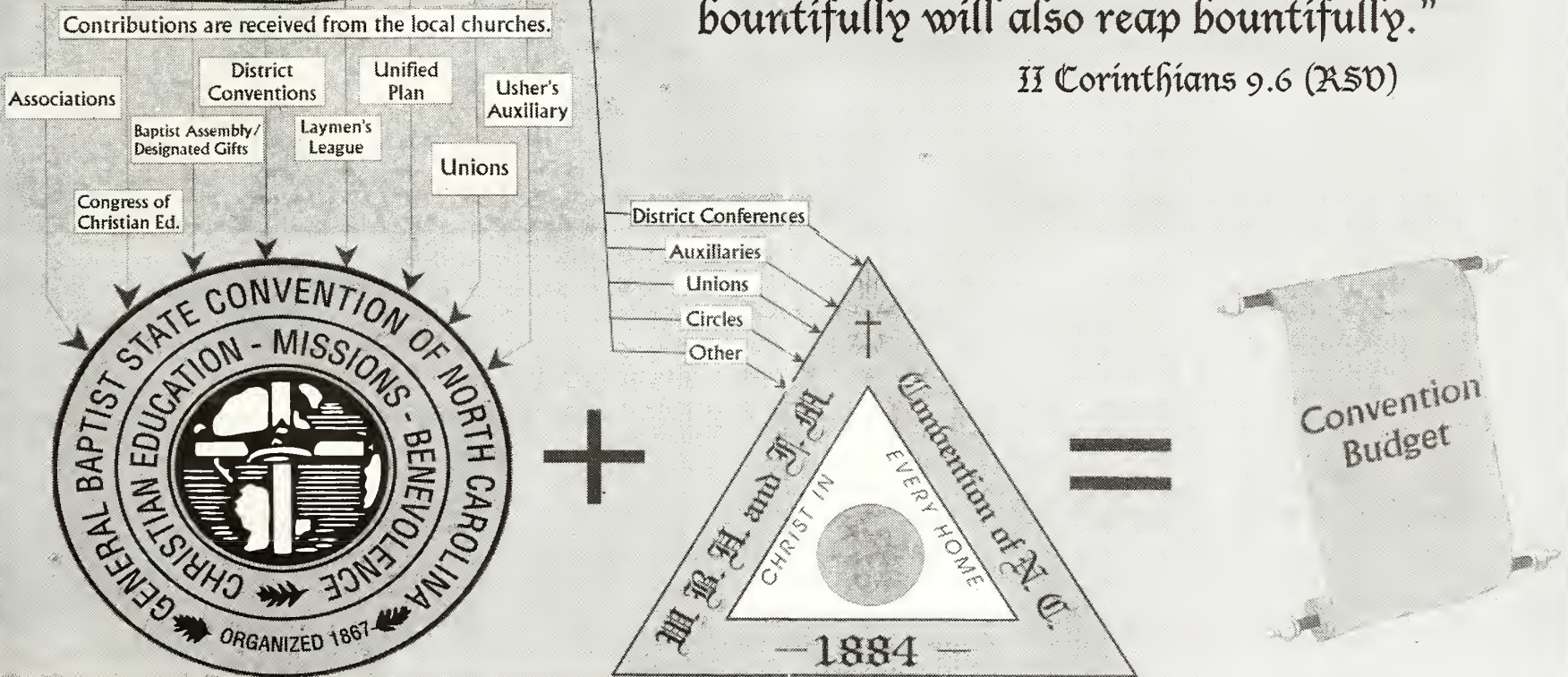

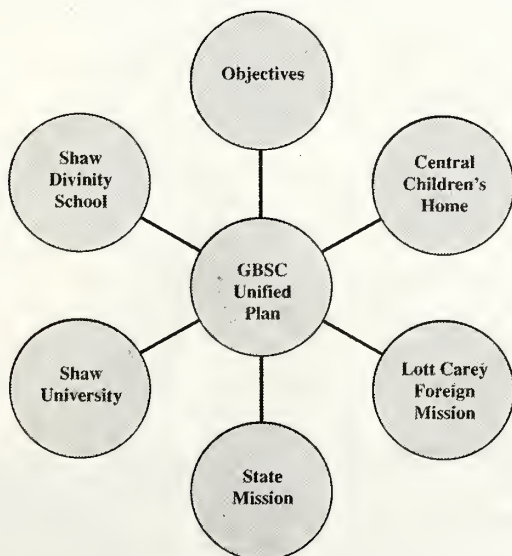

The incorporation of the Baptist Sentinel Publishing Company is dated April 27, 1905. It remained as the official organ of the Convention. Taking over the paper in 1942, Reverend Otis Hairston was the editor for fourteen years. During his regime, the name of the paper was change from, the *Union Reformer* to the *Baptist Informer*. In an attempt to give North Carolina Baptists a more attractive publication with a name more meaningful the journal was changed to a 16-page magazine, and the name to Baptist Informer, February, 1942. 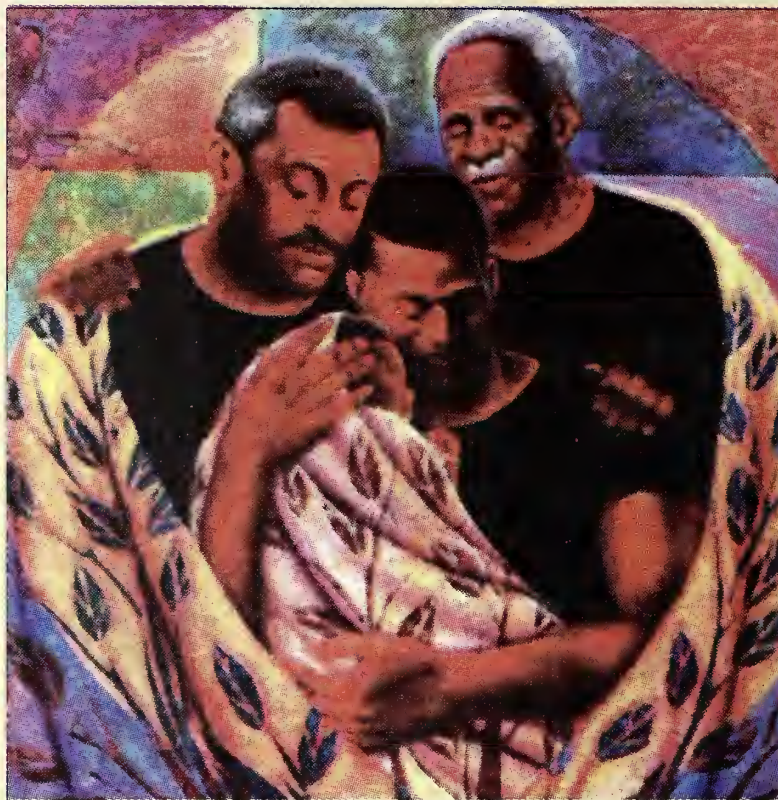

On Monday, June 11, 2007 the General Board of the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina met at the Christian Faith Baptist Church of Raleigh, Dr. David C. Forbes, Sr., Pastor.

The General Board functions as the Convention when the Convention is not in session thus handling the affairs and business of the Convention. While the attendance of the General Board meeting

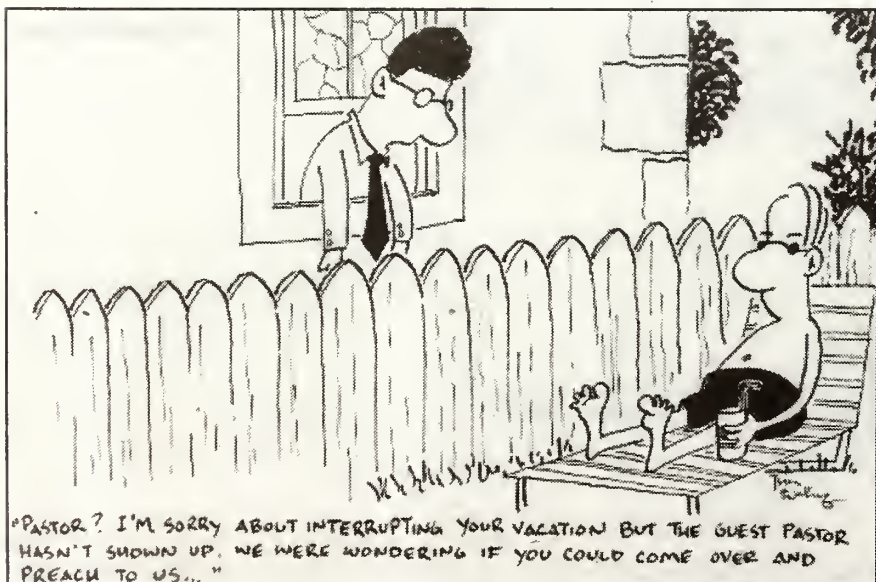

"There is no more dramatic example of a Christ-changed life than the Apostle Paul. While on his way to Damascus to capture Christians and put them in jail, Jesus blinded Paul and asked: "Why do you persecute Me?"

(Acts 9:4). When Paul asked who was speaking, Jesus replied: "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. Now get up and go into the city, and you will be told what you must do" (Acts 9:5-6).

Jesus identified Paul as "My chosen instrument to carry My name before the Gentiles and their kings and before the people of Israel" (Acts 9:15). This special selection did not make Paul perfect, but he was gifted with a close relationship with Jesus as well as special insight into the true gospel message.

Paul suffered many hardships and trials during his years of ministry. His life was continually threatened; he was beaten many times, placed in prison for extended periods, and faced the frustration of ministering to people who failed to truly appreciate his message. And yet, Paul weighed his trials on the scale of eternity.

2 Corinthians 4:16-17

"Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all."

Paul had learned "the secret of being content in any and every situation" (Philippians 4:12). He found his troubles to become light and momentary as he viewed his life from an eternal perspective.

Our life must no longer be viewed with a beginning and an end, but truly as being eternal. Though our days on earth may sometimes be difficult, our days are very few. A hundred years is not even a visible speck on the canvas of eternity. And the weight of our burdens vanish to nothing when compared to the glory of Heaven. This is the eternal perspective.

God's peace and contentment requires us to expand our view to include an eternity we cannot see and a glory we may not understand. "I have told you these things, so that in Me you may have peace" (John 16:33). ## The Landmark Group

ASHEVILLE—Mount Zion Community Development, Inc. and The Landmark Group of Winston-Salem have announced plans for 58 loft condominiums and retail space on the property owned by Mt. Zion Missionary Baptist Church just west of the church in downtown Asheville. The \$20 million development calls for renovating three historic buildings and building three others on a hillcrest site that would give residents of the New York-style lofts magnificent views, particularly of Beaucatcher Mountain and the downtown skyline.

Property owners and neighbors in

the South Pack Square Planning Area were invited to a meeting on June 7 at which the development team unveiled preliminary plans for the project that brings renewed residential and economic life to the former foundry site.

Preliminary plans call for 41 one-bedroom and 17 two-bedroom condos starting in the \$180,000 range plus four retail/commercial spaces. Three of the buildings would feature interior parking, with additional exterior parking in the courtyard and along former South Spruce Street.

"We think this is a good plan," said the Rev. John H. Grant, pastor of Mount Zion Missionary Baptist Church. "It's time for us to act and make something happen."

Mt. Zion Missionary Baptist Church ([www.mtzionasheville.org](http://www.mtzionasheville.org)) has served the Asheville community for 127 years and has owned the property since the 1990s. The Landmark Group ([www.landmarkdevelopment.biz](http://www.landmarkdevelopment.biz)) has won national awards for historic preservation and adaptive reuse projects. It has worked with closely with community interests in developing more than \$350 million in projects in seven states.

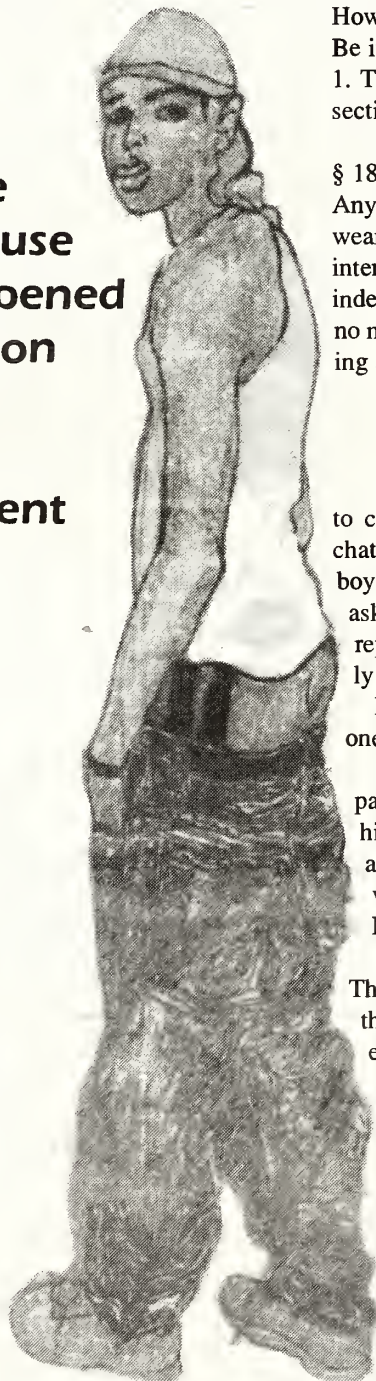
Young men were molested by older and stronger inmates.

Louisiana state legislator Derrick Shepherd (D-Jefferson Parish) proposed House Bill 1626:

R.S. 14:106.3 is hereby enacted to read as follows:

106.3. Illegally wearing pants below waist in public; penalty

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to appear in public wearing his pants below his waist and thereby exposing his skin or intimate clothing.

B. Whoever violates the provisions of this Section shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars or imprisoned for not more than six months, or both.

Similarly in 2005, Virginia state legislator Algie Howell (D-Norfolk) proposed House Bill 1981:

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 18.2-387.1 as follows:

§ 18.2-387.1. Indecent display of underwear.

Any person who, while in a public place, intentionally wears and displays his below-waist undergarments, intended to cover a person's intimate parts, in a lewd or indecent manner, shall be subject to a civil penalty of no more than \$50. "Intimate parts" has the same meaning as in § 18.2-67.10.

#### Stop Saggin'

The other day, a friend came to my dorm room just to chat while her laundry was drying. As we were chatting, two young freshmen came by. One of the boys wanted to "talk" to my friend (as in date). She asked him how old they were, and both of the boys replied 18. My friend and I both laughed hysterically because we are both 22 years old. After my friend left, the young men were still hanging around and one wanted to know how he could gain her interest.

The first thing I told him to do was to pull up his pants. He asked why, and then said he liked saggin' his pants. I told him to come over to my computer and spell the word saggin'. Then I told him to write the word saggin' backwards. S-A-G-G-I-N—N-I-G-G-A-S.

I told him the origin of that look was from prison. The reason their pants looked like that was because they were not allowed to have belts because prisoners were likely to try to commit suicide. And also if their pants were saggin under their butts that meant the man was available for sex!!!

We as young Black people have to be the ones to effect change. We are dying. The media has made a mockery of the Black American. Even our brothers and sisters from Africa don't take us seriously. Something as simple as pulling up your pants and standing with your head high could make the biggest difference in the world's perception of us.

It is time to do right by ourselves. We need to love and embrace each other. No one is going to do it for us. It all comes down to perception. What people perceive is what is reality to them. We have to change not only the media's perception of us, but we need to

change our perception of ourselves. Remember all eyes are on you Black Man. All eyes are on you Black Woman. All eyes are on you Black Child. People are waiting for us to mess up.

We have let not only the media, but the government and the world taint the pure essence of us. They have stripped our culture down to the point where we only believe we can become rappers and athletes. We are so much more!

#### To all my Black Men:

It's time to stand up. There are billions of Black Women who want to do nothing more than worship the ground that you walk on. We are so in love with your potential. We want to have you back, we want to love, support and cherish every ounce of your being. But with that you have to show that you are willing to be the head of our households. You have to prove yourselves worthy of our submission. We need you to be hard working...Not a hustler. We need you to seek higher education, to seek spirituality. We need you to stand! And trust us; we will have you back.

We know that it gets hard, we know you get weary. Trust and believe that there is nothing that a Black woman and a Black man can't handle with God on their side.

#### To all my Black Women:

It is also time for us to stand up. It is time for us to stop using our bodies as our primary form of communication. It is time to be that virtuous woman that Proverbs spoke of. We can not sit by the wayside while our men are dying by the masses. We are the epitome of Black love. It starts within us. We need to speak with conviction to let not only our Black men know, but the world know that we are the mothers of this world. We are so powerful. We are so beautiful. We need to love and embrace every blessing God has given us physically, emotionally and spiritually.

#### For all my Black Children:

We need to love them. We need to teach them. We need to stand up for them. We need to protect them. We need to show them that there are no "get rich quick" schemes. We need to tell them that they WILL die trying if they submit to a life of crime and deceit. We need to teach our children that no one will love them the way we can. And being a basketball player, a rapper, or a drug dealer is not reality. It's not realistic and only a small percentage of people ever make it as a rapper or professional athlete.

We need to teach our children that we can be more than rappers and athletes. We can be the owners of those sports teams; we can be the CEO's of our fortune 500 companies. We need to believe in literacy. I am almost certain if we were to look back to the 1930's and 40's, the literacy rates for Black American children are probably still the same.

**OK...I am stepping off of my soap box now. Pull Up Your Pants!!**

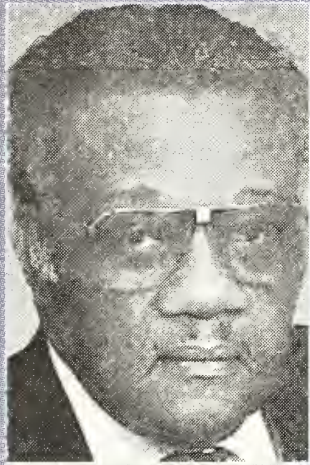

## *Apex Woman Suffers Aneurysm One Day Before Husband Returns From War*

June 4, 2007 - Barbara Dunston waited for her husband to come home from Iraq. When she got the news that he was on his way, she was "over the moon," according to her sister, Rose Gillard. So on Sunday morning - at the New Providence Missionary Baptist Church, Fuquay, N. C., (Rev. Nathaniel J. Wood, Pastor) where she spent much of her time mentoring young people - Barbara told the congregation the good news. Her husband was in Wisconsin on the last leg of his trip and would be returning home the



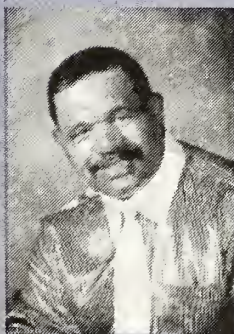
next day. But before the church service ended, something went terribly wrong. Barbara, 56, collapsed and suffered a brain aneurysm. Doctors kept her alive so her husband could say goodbye when he returned home the next day.

"We were just trying to hold on until my father could get home," Alteric Dunston, her son, said Thursday.

"Everything that she did ... everything that she did, somehow indirectly helped someone else," Alteric Dunston said. Barbara Dunston was an organ donor, and her organs have already helped several people in need of transplants, the family said.

When you consult with me, my first step is a detailed inquiry of the various programs at you church. This enables me to understand my services. Our first meeting is to get acquainted and find out your needs.

The second step is providing a master plan of your entire church property and renderings or models of the proposed buildings.

The third step is preparing your construction drawing which include:

- Sound systems
- Special lighting effects
- Design plans
- Structural design
- Energy saving heating and cooling
- Specifications (in laypersons language)

I have found that coordinating all of these design phases through one firm avoids costly delays, misunderstanding and mistakes during constructions.

There are many phases in church planning and design which require a specialist in that field. When you start your next building program, I hope you will give me a call.

# Frequently Asked Questions About Campaign 750

**1. What is Campaign 750?** Campaign 750 Churches agree to give \$100.00 each month designated for State Missions. The second part of the Campaign is to identify three (3) persons in each of the 750 Churches who will give \$10.00 each month designated for State Missions.

**2. Does my Church have to give every month?** Yes. In order for the Campaign to be successful and the necessary funds raised, each Church that enrolls will be expected to contribute each month.

**3. When are funds due?** Campaign 750 funds are due by the **tenth day of each month**. Please be sure that your financial staff mails your check in sufficient time to be received at the Baptist Headquarters by the tenth day of each month.

**4. Does our Church need a special form?** No. All your Church needs to do is to make a note on the check for Campaign 750 and the proper accounting of your funds will be noted.

**5. May we send our contributions for missions and objectives in the same check as Campaign 750?** PLEASE DO NOT. Please send a separate check for Campaign 750. Your funds will be deposited into a restricted account separate from the account where other monies are deposited.

**6. Can my Church pay up ahead of time?** If your Church wishes to send its funds in advance (for example, \$300.00 for a quarter), it may do so. However,

Churches are encouraged to send the funds monthly.

**7. Why is it so important to send the funds monthly?** By sending funds monthly, we are much better able to budget for the Convention's expenses. We can project what we will receive each month and plan to pay the Convention's bills which are received each month.

**8. May a Church send more than \$100.00 a month?** Most certainly. The \$100.00 is the minimum amount requested. This amounts to \$15.00 a Sunday for those Churches with services every Sunday. (It's only \$12.50 a service if your Church has two services on Sunday.) Some Churches will decide to send more when thinking of their resources and blessings.

**9. What about our Church's contributions to the other objectives?** Your Church is still expected to contribute regularly to support the objectives of the Convention. The Campaign 750 donation is above and beyond what your Church is currently sending. If your Church is not supporting the Convention, Campaign 750 gives your Church a good starting point.

**10. How should we find individuals in our Church to contribute?** Whatever method you use is fine. You may solicit three people to give for an entire year. You may solicit three different people each month.

**11. How should the funds collected from individuals be sent in?** Our preference would be that the Church collect the funds and send them along with the Church's funds once a month. However, if the individuals choose to send their contributions directly to us, please be sure that they indicate Campaign 750 on their check as well as give the name of your Church.

**12. What will be done with the funds when we send them in?** Campaign 750 funds will be deposited directly into a restricted account. As the Convention has needs to use the funds sent, money will be transferred from the restricted account. By handling the funds this way, the Headquarters will be best able to account for all contributions received.

**13. What will the funds be used for?** First, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for OPERATIONS expenses. Secondly, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for PROGRAMMING expenses. Finally, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for CONVENTION DEBT TO VENDORS.

**14. How long will it take to pay off the Convention's debt?** Along with other strategies to retire our debt, it is estimated that the Convention's debt could be settled in twenty-seven (27) months if Campaign 750 is fully implemented.

**15. What will happen once the debt to vendors is paid?** The Convention will then apply funds from Campaign 750 to pay funds due to the objectives from previous fiscal years.

**16. What happens once the funds due to objectives is paid?** Once the Convention has all of its debt obligations (both to vendors and to the objectives), the funds from Campaign 750 will be used to expand the Convention's programming and services.

**17. Will we stop enrolling Churches once 750 have enrolled?** Certainly not. We would like to see every General Baptist Church participate. 750 is a goal to work toward. We hope to exceed this goal.

**18. Could an Association or an Association Auxiliary enroll?** Yes. We would welcome the support from local Associations or Auxiliaries of Associations.

**19. What if our Church loses track of our contributions?** Not a problem. You will receive a receipt and the Baptist Headquarters will be able to provide a statement of your contributions upon request.

**20. Can our Church designate where we want Campaign 750 funds applied?** No. If you wish to make a contribution for a certain reason, please do not label your funds Campaign 750. Funds for Campaign 750 will be used according to the greatest immediate need: either operations, programming, or debt reduction. You may always send a designated contribution which will be applied according to your instructions.

I have served on the Board of the Central Children's Home since nineteen eighty nine, served in the position as president and vice president. It has been a real challenge.

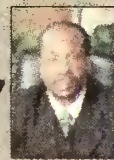

## Dr. Haywood T. Gray announces one million dollars for missions

The Executive Secretary-Treasurer has announced that the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, Inc. has exceeded one million dollars raised for and sent to the

Convention's objectives since January 2005. The Convention's objectives (Shaw University, Shaw University Divinity School, Lott Carey Baptist

Foreign Missions Convention, and the Central Children's Home) have received a total of \$1,074,877.33 since January 2005. This is significant because it marks the first million dollars raised for the objectives since Dr. Haywood T. Gray has been in the office of Executive Secretary-Treasurer. This announcement also celebrates over two years of a policy of forwarding funds raised for objectives in a timely manner instituted by the EST. The head of each of the objectives has applauded the Baptist Headquarters for its commitment to this policy.

The record of funds sent to the objectives since January 2005 shows a total of \$480,785.00 for Shaw University, \$138,269.60 for Shaw

University Divinity School, \$144,347.47 for Central Children's Home, and \$311,475.26 for Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Missions Convention. The million dollar mark was passed in mid-May.

The current management policy of the EST requires that all funds collected for the objectives be forwarded to the objectives at the close of the month. Funds are required to be sent by the tenth day of the month, but staff very often gets the funds out sooner. The GBSC Finance Committee meets each month and (among other reports the Committee receives) is a "Schedule of Funds Sent to Objectives" which allows the Committee to monitor the continuing implementation of the policy. The million dollars

for missions" does not include any funds that may have been sent Haywood T. Gray directly to serve as the 10th the objectives by the Churches. The Baptist Headquarters only accounts for funds sent to and through the Headquarters. In commenting on the milestone, Gray said, "I am so pleased to be an agent in raising support for our objectives. The Convention has an honorable tradition in missions and it is a wonderful experience to be a small part of that proud history. I am grateful for the opportunity." Gray went on to comment that he is disappointed that more General Baptist Churches are not regular contributors to missions through the Baptist Headquarters. ■

## GBSC Fiscal Year Ends on August 31

## Group rallies against killings : Easton neighbors act for the children

Members of Mount Carmel Missionary Baptist Church and some of their Easton neighbors got together last night to pray, sing and march for their neighborhood.

Speakers in the church parking lot encouraged the crowd to work together to clean up the neighborhood and stop the violence, which includes two homicides since May.

"If they make their presence known, they can make a difference," said the Rev. A.T. Griffey III, the pastor of Mount Carmel.

Earlier, church members went through the neighborhood, which is off Thomasville Road near Interstate 40,

and handed out fliers telling people about the rally and inviting them to come.

More than 100 people listened as Larry France Sr. Told them about the pain of losing his first-born child, Larry France Jr., 40, whom police found shot to death June 17 outside of a home on Louise Road.

France told them that his son was not perfect but should not have died the way he did. He said he has a lot of unanswered questions and that his son's death "left a hole in my heart."

"I took care of him from the day he was born," France said. "He was my right hand."

France said that everyone has to get together and work on the problems. Several speakers said that the problems

of drugs and violence were not limited to the Easton neighborhood.

Chelsey Powers, 15, was shot to death May 28 in the front yard of her home on Charles Street. Police have charged Gerardo Garcia, Francisco Ramos and James Gutierrez with being accessories after the fact in her shooting. No one has been charged with being the gunman.

In France's death, police have charged Dwayne Omar Mcrae with first-degree murder and Terrell Dashawn Russell with being an accessory after the fact.

Winston-Salem City Council Member

Evelyn Terry, who represents the Southeast Ward, told the crowd that she has been working to get police patrols in the area increased and a neighborhood

watch started.

"We have to save and rescue our children. It's going to take all of us to give children an opportunity," she said.

As the group marched through the neighborhood, they sang "I Shall Not Be Moved," and waved to people in their yards.

Patricia Campbell has lived on Swaim Woods Lane for seven years and has watched her neighborhood change for the worse. She said she is tired of the drugs and the killings. She worries that her 3-year-old granddaughter could be killed while playing.

"I want to live in peace," she said.

Griffey said that leaders at Mount Carmel plan to build a family life center at the church and provide programs for area children and teenagers that will include midnight basketball, to give them an alternative to being on the streets.

"My main concern is our children and that we don't lose another generation," he said. "God planted us here, we've got to look out for it."

## Black Americans and HIV/AIDS

### AIDS is caused by a virus called HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus)

When a person is infected with HIV, the virus infects and can kill certain cells in the immune system called T-helper cells. This weakens the immune system so that other opportunistic infections can occur. The HIV-infected person is said to have AIDS (Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome) when they become sick with other specific infections or when the number of T-helper cells has dropped below 200.

People at highest risk of AIDS and HIV infection are:

- People who share needles
- Men who have sex with other men
- Babies born to mothers who have HIV infection
- People who received blood transfusions
- Anyone who has sex with anyone who has or is at risk for AIDS or HIV infection

## Fact Sheet

Of all racial and ethnic groups in the United States, HIV and AIDS have hit African Americans the hardest. The reasons are not directly related to race or ethnicity, but rather to some of the barriers faced by many African Americans. These barriers can include poverty (being poor), sexually transmitted diseases, and stigma (negative attitudes, beliefs, and actions directed at people living with HIV/AIDS or directed at people who do things that might put them at risk for HIV).

When we look at HIV/AIDS by race and ethnicity, we see that African Americans have

- More illness. Even though blacks (including African Americans) account for about 13% of the US population, they account for about half (49%) of the people who get HIV and AIDS.
- Shorter survival times. Blacks with AIDS often don't live as long as people of other races and ethnic groups with AIDS. This is due to the barriers mentioned above.
- More deaths. For African Americans and other blacks, HIV/AIDS is a leading cause of death.

As the pie chart below shows, in 2005, about half (49%) of the people diagnosed with HIV/AIDS were black (according to information from 33 states). Children are included in these data.

The reality is similar for children: HIV/AIDS affects black children the most. In 2005, 104 (63%) of the 166 children under the age of 13 diagnosed with HIV/AIDS in 33 states were black.

As the pie charts below show, blacks account for about half of all people living with HIV/AIDS within each sex category. According to information from 33 states, during 2005,

- among men, 41% of men living with HIV/AIDS were black
- among women, 64% of women living with HIV/AIDS were black

### For black men, the most common ways of getting HIV are (in order)

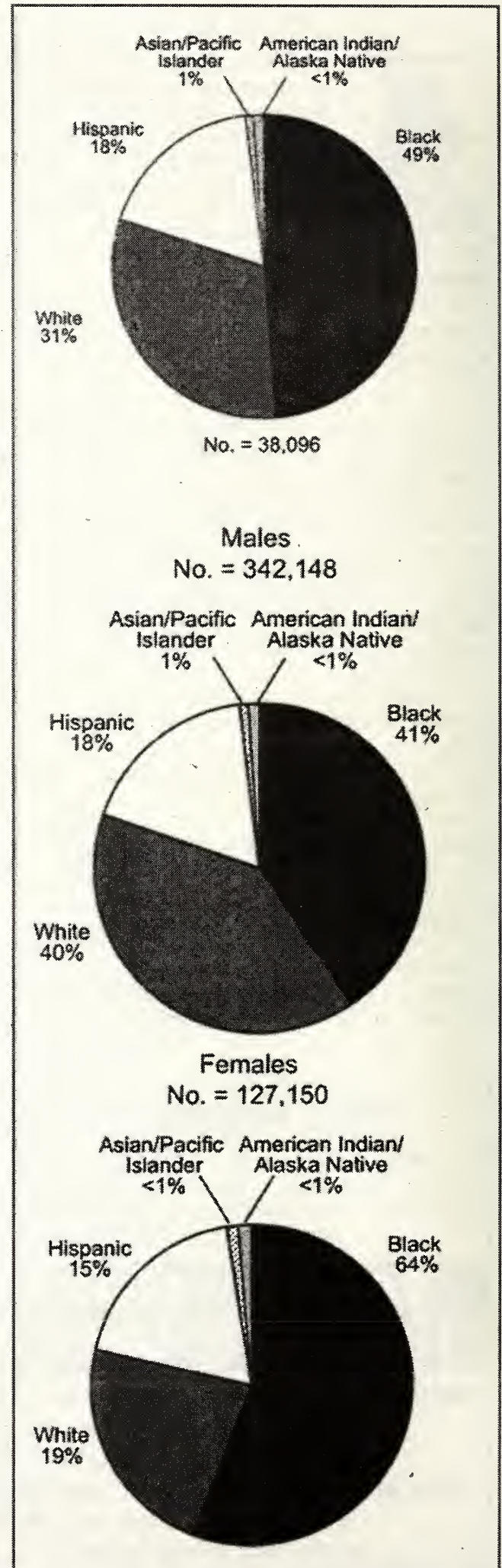
1. having unprotected sex with another man who has HIV
2. sharing injection drug works (like needles or syringes) with someone who has HIV
3. having unprotected sex with a woman who has HIV

### For black women, the most common ways of getting HIV are (in order)

1. having unprotected sex with a man who has HIV
2. sharing injection drug works (like needles or syringes) with someone who has HIV

### Blacks at higher risk for HIV are those

- who are unaware of their partner's risk factors
- with other STDs (which affect more blacks than any other racial or ethnic group)
- who live in poverty (which is about one quarter [25%] of all blacks)

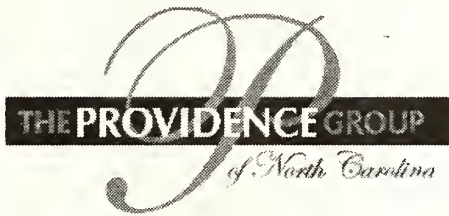
### Taking charge of your finances

## Overcoming Evil With Good By "Preaching The Word of God"

I believe the only offensive weapon we have to fight crime and incarceration is the Word of God. I am convinced any efforts to respond to crime and incarceration that are not founded upon the Word of God will ultimately fail in changing a law breaker into a law abiding person. I believe this because the only thing that can address the root cause of crime is the Word of God (Hebrews 4:12).

The root cause of crime is not poverty, bad neighborhoods, lack of education, or parental absence. These social issues can certainly contribute to the environment being conducive to crime, but they are not the root source of crime. The root source of crime is a sinful nature (human depravity) that is fueled by morally wrong personal choices (Jeremiah 17:9, Romans 3:23, Deuteronomy 30:19). The Word of

God is clear that man is a moral being who is accountable to God for the choices we make in this life (Romans 14:12). The Church in responding to the crime and incarceration crisis must firmly believe the Word of God can deal with the root cause of crime. That is why I am announcing the "OVERCOMING EVIL WITH GOOD PREACHING SERIES". This preaching series will center on the "Christian Response to Crime and Incarceration". I believe it is critical for GBSC Churches to be educated, equipped, and inspired if we are to respond more effectively to at-risk youth, persons in prison, persons coming out of prison, and victims of crime. Therefore, I am praying for the Lord to open avenues for AIM to go around the state to declare these needed messages. There is so much misinformation being shared about crime and incarceration. Not only that, much of what is declared from our pulpits is not accurate or biblical based in directing our responses.

I began working and ministering in the prison setting on July 11, 1979, almost 30 years ago. I have ministered as a prison Chaplain in both state (15 years) and federal prisons (last 13 years) all over the country. I am presently, the only African-

American Chaplaincy Services Administrator in the Federal Bureau of Prisons, overseeing 35 prison Chaplains in 20 federal prisons in the Mid-Atlantic region (NC, VA, WVA, MD, KY, TN). I speak not as a volunteer or an occasional visitor in prison ministry, but as an experienced minister (28 years) in prisons who knows what it takes to make a difference. Most importantly, I have been called, graced, and equipped by God to minister to lives impacted by crime and incarceration.

I am requesting GBSC moderators and Pastors to help me spread this preaching series around our state to get our Associations and Churches more involved. I encourage you to have an ANTI-CRIME & INCARCERATION DAY at your Church. Invite AIM to come share these Christian worldview messages in responding to the crime and incarceration crisis. As the new fiscal year begins, join us in taking AIM by supporting and

allowing the "OVERCOMING EVIL WITH GOOD PREACHING" series to be heard in our GBSC Associations and Churches. Please see the preaching series flyer and share with others and fill out the AIM Commitment Form. We can make a greater difference if we work together as a team in tackling this crisis!

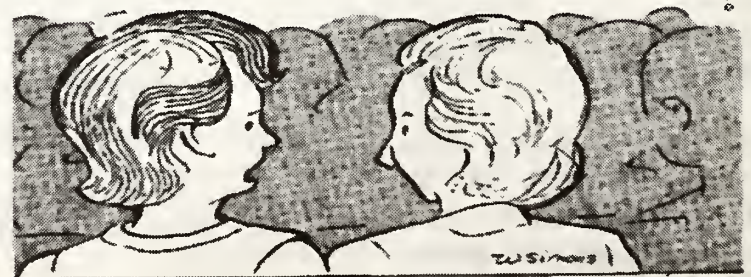

It is a wonderful thing to reflect - to think about where we've been, where we're going and how we're going to get there. An so, reflecting on the month of July, we think about all the events that we look forward to being engaged in at this time - from summer camps to summer vacations, from class and school reunions to a dip in the pool - from picnics in the park to celebrating the Fourth of July.

On July 4, 1776, the United States of America established its independence. July 4, 1007 marked the 231st anniversary of this momentous occasion, and although nearly all of America partook in the various festivities and traditions surrounding the fourth, it is doubtful that very many of us took the time to contemplate the true meaning of the Fourth of July; nor did we reflect on the 231 years that have brought us to the present day. Without doing this, we allow the true significance of the holiday to escape us. It was American Independence and Freedom that our forefathers fought and died for, not the right to have a barbecue. But even with this idea of American Freedom there is cause for thought. Who was this freedom meant for, what is freedom, and it is truly free? All of these are questions people should ask themselves when thinking about the Fourth of July and its

implications.

The first question is perhaps the easiest to answer; yet, it might be the most thought provoking. Clearly the America that our forefathers fought for is not the same America that we know and love today. At this time America was rife with racism, bigotry and discrimination, even slavery. The phrase racial equality did not exist, neither, for that matter, did gender equity. Although our founders espoused the beliefs of "liberty and justice for all", this "all" was extremely limited. In fact, the word "add" did not extend much further than white male landowners, an exclusive group to say the least. It was not until January 1, 1864, at the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation that African Americans were awarded their freedom; 88 years after whites. However, I implore you not to be fooled into believing that in 1864 Blacks were made equal with Whites. The Emancipation Proclamation did little more than legalize African American freedom. It took far more than that to make freedom for Blacks a reality, it took sacrifice.

Throughout the late 1800s and into the 1900s Blacks had to give of their happiness, their liberty and even their lives so that African Americans of today would be able to consider themselves free. These "freedom fighters" of yester-

year endured innumerable injustices and immeasurable pain and suffering. They

preserved through attacking packs of ravenous dogs, through the overwhelming pressure of high powered water hoses and the brutal blows suffered at the hands of "Billy Club" wielding police officers. Like their predecessors and our forefathers, these "freedom fighters" were willing to do whatever it took sacrificing both life and limb, in the hope that one day their children, or their children's children would

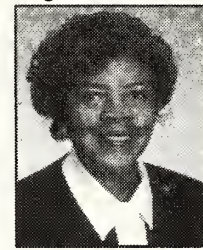
live free. That was the cost of freedom.

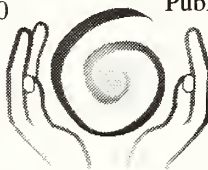

## (NAACP) 98<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention in Detroit. July 7-12, 2007

6-day conference draws thousands as goup struggles with its direction

DETROIT -- The NAACP national convention kicks off Saturday in Detroit, drawing 8,000 people from across the nation who will pump an estimated \$12.5 million into the economy during the six-day conference.

"The NAACP loves Detroit," said NAACP Interim President and CEO Dennis C. Hayes. "We will feel like we are at home there."

The event will also put a spotlight on the city with two huge media events: a ceremonial burial of the "N-word" complete with a faux coffin that will be carried by rappers Kurtis Blow and Eric B., and a presidential forum that will include Barack Obama, Hillary Clinton and John Edwards -- hopefuls seeking to woo voters from an organization instrumental in turning out the black vote.

The convention comes at a time when the nation's oldest and largest civil rights organization is functioning without a permanent leader, struggling to overcome financial setbacks, and cutting a third of its national staff of 119 people in the midst of closing its eight regional offices. Membership has fallen from a high of 500,000 in 1946 to 300,000 today.

Honoraria and Expenses, Staff Salaries and Benefit, Attorneys, Accountants and Consultants Fees, Computer Maintenance, Office Supplies, Office Machines, Postage and Shipping, Property, Workers Comp, and General Liability Insurance, Printing of books, brochures, newspaper, announcements, programs, and flyers; Expenses to operate the Baptist Headquarters including gas, water, electricity, telephones, janitorial, trash disposal, security, and upkeep; Expenses to operate the J.J. Johnson Baptist Assembly in Laurel Hill including gas, electricity, telephones, custodial services, lawn upkeep and grass cutting, heating & air conditioning maintenance, plumbing, upkeep of swimming pool, and certified pool oper-

ators and life guards.

Expenses for each Session of the Parent Body and Auxiliaries which includes: Rental of facilities like convention centers, printing of materials for Sessions, preparation of registration kits and badges, staff travel to make arrangement for host pastors and host Churches, lodging for staff and special guests. Banquet costs including food, rental of space, service fees, mailings, publicity and advertising, awards and plaques.

## Passion for the Text

The Preacher's Passion  
Dr. Alfonso Fullwood

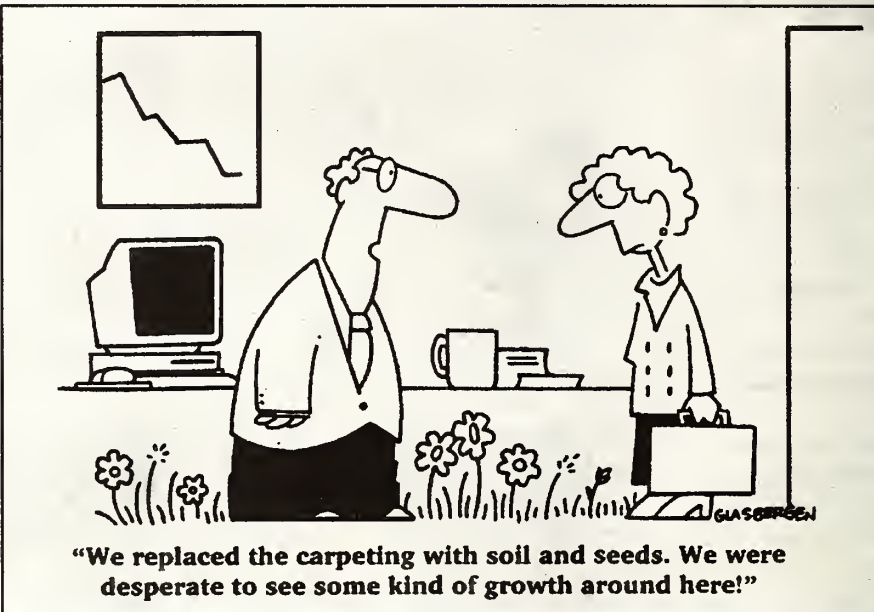

I would like to begin this conversation with the suggestion that the mechanics of preaching is not as important as the message preached. However, volumes of books on the homiletical selves suggest the contrary.

Trends in preaching over the past several decades have shifted from propositional preaching to forms and methods designed to better suit audience listening. The reason for this preoccupation with the mechanics is related to a spiraling down of audience interest in preaching. Homileticians such as Fred Craddock, David Buttrick and Henry Mitchell are partnering other disciplines with homiletics and exploring communication dynamics aimed to create a hearing or listening event. They are forcing us to not just ask what to say in our preaching but how to say it. While these homileticians have made a substantial contribution in helping us understand the relationship between sermon forms/methods and listening; it has cause a shift in priorities. The focus is on the audience to the neglect of sermon substance. There has been a mass defection from substantive preaching, and amusing the audience through an entertainment homiletic is winning the loyalty of many preachers. The shift from substance (Word) to audience has also caused our passion to shift. Having a passion for the mechanics and art of preaching is not the equivalence of having a passion for the text. By mechanics I mean the way preaching is done in terms of its execution; by art I mean the creative expression of talent or skill in communicating the gospel.

Preaching involves proclamation of the gospel through the expression of human creativity in both visual and vocal forms. In this sense, preaching is viewed as a creative performing art, similar to music, singing, dancing and poetry. Our preaching displays great artistry to the delight of the audience. My use of the word audience is intentional. This represents the third shift. The term "congregation" has been replaced with the term "audience" on the premise that people want a "feel good experience through amusement." Today, "people want to be entertained not converted," says William H. Willimon (Willimon, p. 204). The actual act of preaching is moving towards performance-- to preach is to perform. In her insightful work, *Performing the Word: Preaching as Theatre*, Jana Childers shows the kinship between preachers and actors. She deals with preaching as performance, laying drama along side homiletics. Believing that there is a performance-based approach to preaching, she argues that it is necessary to draw on "the modi operandi of actors and their performance arts" (Childers p. 36-56). Because of this performing element, we should caution ourselves concerning an entertainment homiletic that aims to amuse and comfort only. Preaching like performing arts presupposes audience assumption. The artistry of preaching as in the Performing Arts does not exist for itself nor does it serve itself. It is for the audience benefit, their appreciation, joy, thrill, excitement, inspiration, conviction and transformation. Some feel that the audience is everything in the preaching moment (McDill p. 39). Exalting audience satisfaction over substantive content is honoring the audience above our Lord. Knowing your audience is necessary if your aim is to communicate effectively, but it is far better to provide a substantive word from the Lord.

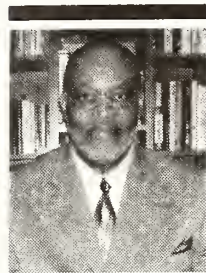

The General Board of the GBSC adopted a pastor's retirement plan with the MMBB which remains in effect for this 2007 fiscal year. The Ministers and Missionaries Benefit Board (MMBB) serves those who work for Baptist churches and affiliated organizations—and has since 1911. The Board's mission to American Baptist Churches (ABC)

ministers, missionaries and lay employees, as well as their families, has grown steadily over the years. The combination of crucial benefits and personalized service has bolstered members through both national and personal financial and social storms. In 2000, an IRS ruling opened the MMBB plans to related organizations, and MMBB embraced this opportunity to expand its benefits and services to new groups.

MMBB understands the unique blessings and challenges of the ministry, and supports plan members throughout their lives. Hallmarks include skilled professional money management, educational opportunities and service provided by responsive member service representatives. MMBB communications keep members and employers informed and in touch. MMBB knows the ministry, and MMBB cares.

### Annuity Features

Annuities are tax deferred retirement

plans offered by insurance companies. The MMBB plan uses a variable annuity that rises and falls depending on MMBB's investment results.

### Choosing Your Form of Annuity Payment

Your annuity payments can take any of the following forms:

- Single-Life Annuity

You receive monthly retirement check for life. Payments stop at your death.

- 100%/100% Joint and Survivor Annuity

When either you or your spouse dies, the survivor's monthly check will be based on the same number of annuity units for life.

- 80%/80% Joint and Survivor Annuity

When either you or your joint annuitant dies, the survivor's annuity will be based on the same number of annuity units for life.

- 100%/60% Joint and Survivor Annuity

If your spouse dies first, your retirement check continues at 100% for the rest of your life. If you die first, your spouse receives 60% of your monthly check for life.

### Your Ten-Year Guarantee

Your annuity payment will include a 10-year guarantee feature. The guarantee provides payment of the first ten years of annuity payments. If you and your joint annuitant die before receiving at least ten years of payment, your beneficiary or your estate will receive the remaining value for the 10-year period. If you and/or

your spouse live beyond the 120-month period, annuity payments continue for as long as either of you lives. This guarantee applies even if you elect a single-life annuity payment option. The waiver of this feature would add less than 1% to the amount of the joint-life and survivorship payment and a little more than that on the single-life payment. The increase depends on your age, the age of your spouse and other factors.



### Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

Q: How do I enroll for this plan?

A: Call the Providence Group of North Carolina at 919-858-7819 and ask for Dexter Perry in order to get your MMBB enrollment packet.

Q: When I decide to retire, what should I do?

A: At least 90 days before your retirement date, notify MMBB and your nearest Social Security office. MMBB will send you information and forms. Social Security will require your Social Security card or number, proof of your date of birth, and, if married, a copy of your marriage certificate.

Q: Will the amount of my MMBB annuity change each year?

A: Yes. It is a variable annuity and will increase or decrease each year, depending upon MMBB's investment results.

Q: May I continue to serve my present church and still receive my MMBB annuity?

A: No. You must retire from your present church before you take your MMBB annuity. You may, however, secure other employment without affecting your annuity.

Q: Are loans available to retired members?

A: TAS, TDA, and Retirement Plan loans are available to retired members who have not annuitized or withdrawn all of their plan accumulation units. The minimum amount required in their account is \$2,000. The repayment period cannot extend beyond the last day of the calendar year in which they attain age 70.5. No loans to retired members can be made after that date.

Q: Do I need a financial planner?

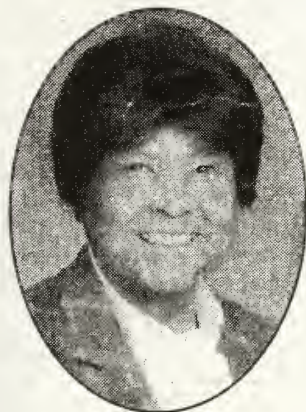
A: Although there are printed and other resources readily available to the public on financial planning, most of us need help in knowing how to use this information to meet our own particular needs. If you need help, contact Dexter Perry at The Providence Group to discuss your needs.

Q: How do I determine how much income I will need in retirement?

A: Professional retirement planners suggest that you should have three sources of retirement income: (1) Social Security, (2) an employer-provided annuity, and (3) personal resources. To maintain your pre-retirement living standard, many planners recommend a combination of these sources should equal at least 70% to 80% of your final compensation. 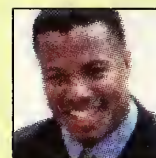

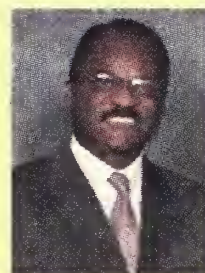

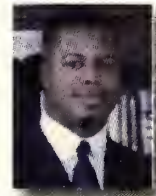

## 70 Uses for Vinegar

### VINEGAR FOR PERSONAL CARE

- Vinegar in the bath. Add one-half cup of vinegar or so to warm bath water when bathing and get double benefits: softer skin and a cleaner bathtub with less work!
- Hair conditioner. Vinegar makes a simple, inexpensive conditioner for your hair and helps remove the sticky stuff shampoo can leave behind. About a tablespoon will do it.
- Dandruff treatment. Simply pour a few tablespoons of vinegar on your hair and massage into your scalp. Wait a few minutes, then rinse and wash hair like normal. Try this for a few days until you see results.

• Weight loss. Vinegar naturally helps to remove fat from the body. Apple cider vinegar is especially good for this. Drink some in a glass of water a few times a day. Add a little lemon or honey for a nicer flavor. This will also help reduce your appetite.

- Dry skin repair. Smooth a little vinegar on cracked, dried skin to help it heal.
- Clean dentures. Soak dentures overnight in Heinz White Vinegar, then brush away tartar with a toothbrush.

- Remove spots from glass. Use a vinegar-soaked cloth to remove spots from glassware or crystal.
- Unclog drains. Pour boiling white vinegar down clogged drains to remove the clog.
- Clean jars. Remove odors and stains from jars by cleaning them out with vinegar.
- Clean old lunchboxes. Soak a piece of bread in vinegar and let it sit in the lunchbox overnight.
- Clean and deodorize the garbage disposal. Make vinegar ice cubes and feed them down the disposal. After grinding, run cold water.
- Clean the tea pot. Boil a mixture of water and vinegar in the teapot. Wipe away the grime.
- Clean the dishwasher. Run a cup of vinegar through the whole cycle once a month to reduce soap build-up on the inner mechanisms and on glassware.
- Clean the microwave. Boil a solution of 1/4 cup of vinegar and 1 cup of water in the microwave. This mixture will loosen splattered-on food and deodorize the microwave.
- Remove smoke smells from clothing. Add a cup of vinegar to a bath tub of hot water. Hang clothes above the steam.

- Clean eyeglasses. Wipe each lens with a drop of vinegar.
- Remove stains from furniture and upholstery. Remove stubborn stains from furniture upholstery and clothes. Apply Heinz White Vinegar directly to the stain, then wash as directed by the manufacturer's instructions.

- Stretch ketchup. Only have a little ketchup left in the bottle? Add a bit of vinegar and give it a good shake -- you'll have a bit more!
- Boiling eggs. Add a bit of white vinegar to the water you're boiling your eggs in, and the shells won't crack.
- Cooking cabbage. Add a bit of vinegar to the water you're cooking your cabbage in to remove that stinky cabbage smell.
- Fluffier meringues. Add 1 teaspoon of vinegar for every three egg whites, and you'll have fluffier meringues.
- Tenderize meat. Soak in vinegar overnight.
- Unsticky rice. To cook rice without sticking, add a spoonful of vinegar.
- Remove onion odors. Eliminate onion odor on your skin by rubbing vinegar on your fingers before and after slicing.

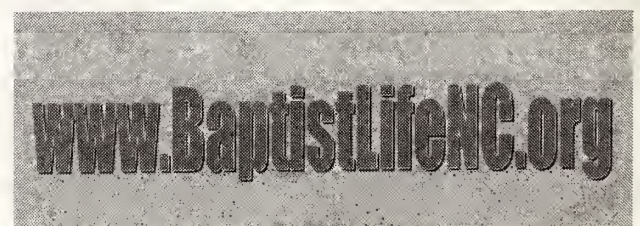
## Local Church Installs New Pastor

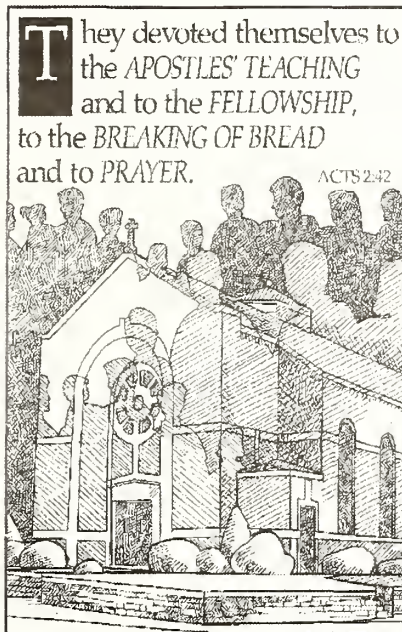
by becoming a Christian. Christians are regularly typified in regards to evangelism as "...one beggar telling another beggar where to find bread."

### Fed give approval: Same-day registration set to begin next month in NC

The U.S. Department of Justice allowing North Carolina to implement new procedures that will let a citizen register and vote on the same day during the early voting period before any election held on or after October 9th, according to written authorization received by the State Board of Elections.

Early voting for cities with October elections begins September 20 and continues until October 6 at county board of elections offices or at a

nearby building. Some counties provide additional sites, but in the low-volume municipal elections held in October and November, many are not open until the final week before an election. The approval letter comes as the final chapter in a multi-year campaign by voting rights groups to make voting more accessible and secure, especially for young people and others who move frequently or who have inflexible work schedules and transportation options.

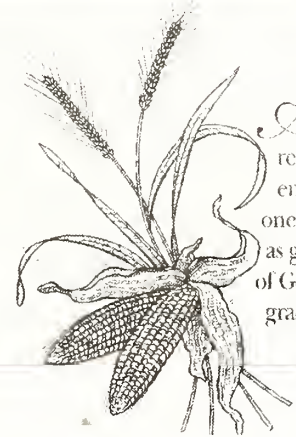

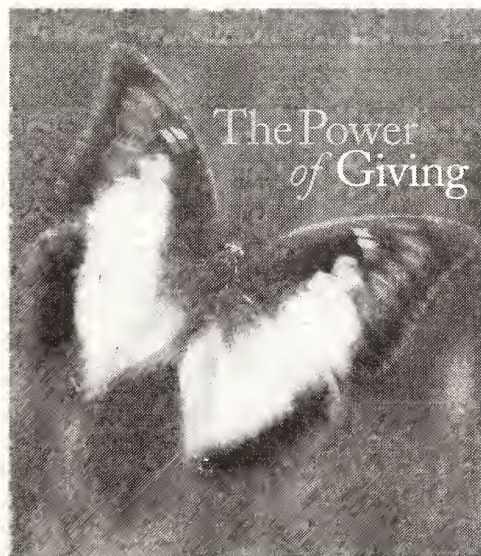

Greetings to you in the name of Jesus the Christ. Isn't it good to know you are a child of the King?!

I trust you were able to partake in our Annual Session activities. Months of planning and preparation occurred to ensure there was something for everyone. In particular, special attention was given to making the session as informative as possible. This administration is determined to offer the best teaching and training available to our churches and associations. It is our intention for pastors and lay-leaders to see the convention as a valuable resource for equipping, training and developing opportunities for mission and ministry projects. Thus, there was excitement around the seminars on education, music, women in ministry, finance, grant writing and procurement, health, retirement and disability, homelessness and transitioning, anti-crime, preaching and preachers. Countless hours of pouring over reports, checks, receipts and minutes proved we are headed to recovery and have put into practice sound financial practices. We are indebted to Dr. Gray and the staff for their diligence, dedication and sacrifice not just during the audit, but also on a daily basis.

As I, our vice-presidents, Dr. Gray and other officers crisscross the state, we are made aware of the tremendous desire and need for the convention to aid and assist local churches and associations in various ways. They challenge us to do more. However, we (the convention) are somewhat limited because of the level of support we receive from the majority of the General Baptist family. The magnificent work by Dr. Gray and staff did not come without challenge, difficulty and sacrifice. Many churches are not stepping up with support. I am convinced there are multiple reasons for our current state of affairs. Many pastors and key laypersons once loyal to our work and vision have retired or passed on to the next life. Some churches have new pastors who are not familiar with our convention and have yet to embrace our work and our vision. There are others who have lost faith in us for whatever reason and have established a "wait-and-see" posture. Then, there are still others who do not consider the convention - its work and or vision - as relevant, and have moved on. Perhaps I have not exhausted the list of reasons for the lack of support from some sectors. Yet, whatever category one finds oneself, let me assure you of several things. God has GREAT and WONDERFUL things for this convention to achieve for kingdom building. We ARE relevant and ARE striving to change our paradigm for the present age and beyond. We still embrace and address HUMAN AND SOCIAL JUSTICE issues. We still are leaders in our support of MISSION OBJECTIVES. We QUICKLY RESPOND to disasters in the state, nation and around the globe. And we are TOTALLY COMMITTED to pro-

viding the best teaching, training, exposure and fellowship possible to our churches and associations.

Through the years you have been faithful to send support for our objectives. And for this we are eternally grateful. However, we must be as consistent and diligent in our support for convention operations (STATE MISSIONS). We are not in position to reduce staff further. We must, we must, we must change our culture of giving to include consistent support of operations through State Missions. It is simple - each church contributing a MINIMUM of 1,300 dollars per year designated for State Missions. This is less than one hundred nine dollars per month! Individuals who can and will are encouraged to do the same. I am sure most would agree that is not much for a church for an entire year. Believe me, your contribution will yield many benefits. And to those who have much, much is required. I made a promise in conjunction with Dr. Gray-we WILL NOT use objective contributions to operate our work. It takes money to staff a convention and we need you to be faithful to your promise as members of our great convention to support operations through State Missions. During the past two years, hard decisions were made. Staff was reduced, yet many of the services and benefits continue. Essentially, Dr. Gray and our staff have "made bricks without straw". We cannot expect them to help us achieve other levels of ministry under these conditions.

Thank you in advance for your prayerful consideration in this matter. I am asking you to step up and embrace the vision of CONVINCING THE UNCONVINCED TO BE CONVINCED- EDUCATION, TRAINING AND FELLOWSHIP. I know we can, I believe we will and with God's guidance, it shall be done!

I especially wish to thank the members of the General Board who met our challenge. Thank you for your faith in God, your willingness to serve and your willingness to partner with me during this season of transition.

## Frequently Asked Questions About Campaign 750

1. What is Campaign 750? Campaign 750 is an effort to have 750 Churches agree to give \$100.00 each month designated for State Missions. The second part of the Campaign is to identify three (3) persons in each of the 750 Churches who will give \$10.00 each month designated for State Missions.

2. Does my Church have to give every month? Yes. In order for the Campaign to be successful and the necessary funds raised, each Church that enrolls will be expected to contribute each month.

3. When are funds due? Campaign 750 funds are due by the tenth day of each month. Please be sure that your financial staff mails your check in sufficient time to be received at the Baptist Headquarters by the tenth day of each month.

4. Does our Church need a special form? No. All your Church needs to do is to make a note on the check for Campaign 750 and the proper accounting of your funds will be noted.

5. May we send our contributions for missions and objectives in the same check as Campaign 750? PLEASE DO NOT. Please send a separate check for Campaign 750. Your funds will be deposited into a restricted account sepa-

rate from the account where other monies are deposited.

6. Can my Church pay up ahead of time? If your Church wishes to send its funds in advance (for example, \$300.00 for a quarter), it may do so. However, Churches are encouraged to send the funds monthly.

7. Why is it important to send the funds monthly? By sending funds monthly, we are much better able to budget for the Convention's expenses. We can project what we will receive each month and plan to pay the Convention's bills which are received each month.

8. May a Church send more than \$100.00 a month? Most certainly. The \$100.00 is the minimum amount requested. This amounts to \$25.00 a Sunday for those Churches with services every Sunday. (it's only \$12.50 a service if your Church has two services on Sunday.) Some Churches will decide to send more when thinking of their resources and blessings.

9. What about our Church's contributions to the other objectives? Your Church is still expected to contribute regularly to support the objectives of the Convention. The Campaign 750 donation is above and beyond what your Church is currently sending. If your Church is not supporting the Convention, Campaign 750 gives your Church a good starting point.

10. How should we find individuals in

our Church to contribute? Whatever method you use is fine. You may solicit three people to give for an entire year. You may solicit three different people each month.

11. How should the funds collected from individuals be sent in? Our preference would be that the Church collect the funds and send them along with the Church's funds once a month. However, if the individuals choose to send their contributions directly to us, please be sure that they indicate Campaign 750 on their check as well as give the name of your Church.

12. What will be done with the funds when we send them in? Campaign 750 funds will be deposited directly into a restricted account. As the Convention has needs to use the funds send, money will be transferred from the restricted account. By handling the funds this way, the Headquarters will be best able to account for all contributions received.

13. What will the funds be used for? First, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for OPERATIONS expenses. Secondly, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for PROGRAMMING expenses. Finally, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for CONVENTION DEBT TO VENDORS.

14. How long will it take to pay off the Convention's debt? Along with other strategies to retire our debt, it is estimated that the Convention's debt could be settled in twenty-seven (27) months if Campaign 750 is fully implemented.

15. What will happen once the debt to vendors is paid? The Convention will then apply funds from Campaign 750 to pay funds due to the objectives from previous fiscal years.

16. What happens once the funds due to objectives is paid? Once the Convention has met all of its debt obligations (both to vendors and to the objectives), the funds from Campaign 750 will be used to expand the Convention's programming and services.

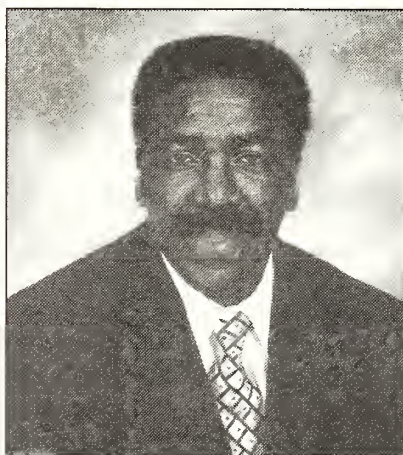
17. Will we stop enrolling Churches once 750 have enrolled? Certainly not. We would like to see every General Baptist Church participate. 750 is a goal to work toward. We hope to exceed this goal.

18. Could an Association or and Association Auxiliary enroll? Yes. We would welcome the support from Associations or Auxiliaries of Associations.

19. What if our Church loses track of our contributions? Not a problem. You will receive a receipt and the Baptist Headquarters will be able to provide a statement of your contribution upon request.

20. Can our Church designate where we want Campaign 750 funds applied? No. If you wish to make a contribution for a certain reason, please do not label your funds Campaign 750. Funds for Campaign 750 will be used according to the greatest immediate need: either operations, programming, or debt reduction. You may always send a designated contribution which will be applied according to your instructions. ■

## Mitchell Missionary Baptist Church Celebrates 140th Church Anniversary



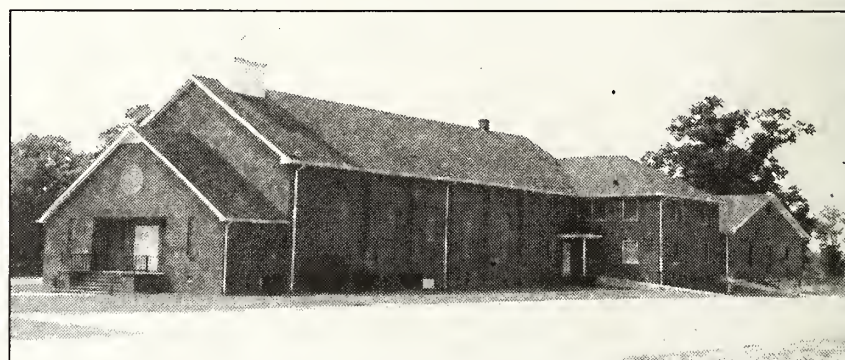

encouragement to the Thessalonians. He knew that they needed others to help them in their Christian journey, and he sent Timothy to encourage them.

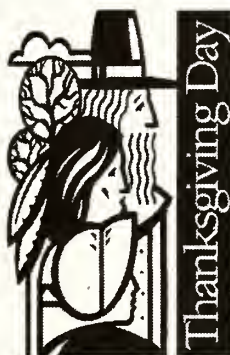

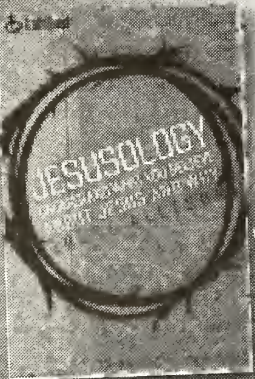

## Know Your Rights: What to Do If You're Stopped by the Police

"My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge."  
(Hosea 4:6)

To fight police abuse effectively you need to know your rights. There are some things you should do, some things you must do and some things you cannot do. If you are in the middle of a police encounter, you need a handy and quick reference to remind you what your rights and obligations are.

1. Think carefully about your words, movement, body language, and emotions.
2. Don't get into an argument with the police.
3. Remember, anything you say or do can be used against you.
4. Keep your hands where the police can see them.
5. Don't run. Don't touch any police officer.
6. Don't resist even if you believe you are innocent.
7. Don't complain on the scene or tell the police they're wrong or that you're going to file a complaint.
8. Do not make any statements regarding the incident. Ask for a lawyer immediately upon your arrest.
9. Remember officers' badge and patrol car numbers.
10. Write down everything you remember ASAP.
11. Try to find witnesses and their names and phone numbers.
12. If you are injured, take photographs of the injuries as soon as possible, but make sure you seek medical attention first.

13. If you feel your rights have been violated, file a written complaint with police department's internal affairs division or civilian complaint board.

1. What you say to the police is always important. What you say can be used against you, and it can give the police an excuse to arrest you, especially if you bad-mouth a police officer.
2. You must show your driver's license and registration when stopped in a car. Otherwise, you don't have to answer any questions if you are detained or arrested, with one important exception: The police may ask for your name if you have been properly detained, and you can be arrested in some states for refusing to give it. If you reasonably fear that your name is incriminating, you can claim the right to remain silent, which may be a defense in case you are arrested anyway.
3. You don't have to consent to any search of yourself, your car or your house. If you DO consent to a search, it can affect your rights later in court. If the police say they have a search warrant, ASK TO SEE IT.
4. Do not interfere with, or obstruct the police -- you can be arrested for it.

### IF YOU ARE STOPPED FOR QUESTIONING

1. It's not a crime to refuse to answer questions, but refusing to answer can make the police suspicious about you. If you are asked to identify yourself, see paragraph 2 above.
2. Police may "pat-down" your clothing if they suspect a concealed weapon. Don't physically resist, but make it clear that you

don't consent to any further search.

3. Ask if you are under arrest. If you are, you have a right to know why.
4. Don't bad-mouth the police officer or run away, even if you believe what is happening is unreasonable. That could lead to your arrest.

### IF YOU'RE STOPPED IN YOUR CAR

1. Upon request, show them your driver's license, registration, and proof of insurance. In certain cases, your car can be searched without a warrant as long as the police have probable cause. To protect yourself later, you should make it clear that you do not consent to a search. It is not lawful for police to arrest you simply for refusing to consent to a search.
2. If you're given a ticket, you should sign it; otherwise you can be arrested. You can always fight the case in court later.
3. If you're suspected of drunk driving (DUI) and refuse to take a blood, urine or breath test, your driver's license may be suspended.

### IF YOU'RE ARRESTED OR TAKEN TO A POLICE STATION

1. You have the right to remain silent and to talk to a lawyer before you talk to the police. Tell the police nothing except your name and address. Don't give any explanations, excuses or stories. You can make your defense later, in court, based on what you and your lawyer decide is best.
2. Ask to see a lawyer immediately. If you can't pay for a lawyer, you have a right to a free one, and should ask the police how the lawyer can be contacted. Don't say anything without a lawyer.
3. Within a reasonable time after your

arrest, or booking, you have the right to make a local phone call: to a lawyer, bail bondsman, a relative or any other person. The police may not listen to the call to the lawyer.

4. Sometimes you can be released without bail, or have bail lowered. Have your lawyer ask the judge about this possibility. You must be taken before the judge on the next court day after arrest.
5. Do not make any decisions in your case until you have talked with a lawyer.

### IN YOUR HOME

1. If the police knock and ask to enter your home, you don't have to admit them unless they have a warrant signed by a judge.
2. However, in some emergency situations (like when a person is screaming for help inside, or when the police are chasing someone) officers are allowed to enter and search your home without a warrant.
3. If you are arrested, the police can search you and the area close by. If you are in a building, "close by" usually means just the room you are in.

We all recognize the need for effective law enforcement, but we should also understand our own rights and responsibilities - especially in our relationships with the police. Everyone, including minors, has the right to courteous and respectful police treatment. If your rights are violated, don't try to deal with the situation at the scene. You can discuss the matter with an attorney afterwards, or file a complaint with the Internal Affairs or Civilian Complaint Board.

Just the other day, I heard a man tell a Saturday evening banquet crowd to go home and prepare for Sunday school. It inspired my heart because I still believe that Sunday school is the best hour a Christian believer could spend during the course of the week. How could one beat one hour during the course of seven days doing something other than spending time with God's word with a group of people who desire the Word as well? It is amazing how people grow up in the church and not have affection for Sunday school just because their mother made them go. People need to realize that Sunday school helps you become more like Christ and more familiar with His Word.

Sunday school in the 21st century is still foundational as it was when Sunday school began in the 1920's. If a church wants to reach hundreds of people, the Sunday school is geared to

help the church grow. The mega church has become the paradigm and model but all churches will not be mega. Smaller churches ought to then focus their attention on impacting the Kingdom of God through Sunday school organization and make sure that it flourishes.

When the church organizes its Sunday school by conducting weekly teachers training meetings it will grow the church. But Sunday school must be intentional. Churches tend not give Sunday school the attention it deserves. The churches effectiveness will be: helping people nourish a personal relationship with Jesus Christ; help people read through the entire Bible, increase the fellowship of the Church, prepare people for worship, and inspire evangelism and mission all through the Sunday school.

The Sunday school, if it is to grow must adhere to the following priorities:

1. Equip and train both teach-

- ers and leaders for the ministry of the Sunday school. Training should be placed on the calendar.
2. Enlist new teachers and provide the necessary training.
3. Set attendance goals and make plans to target people for Sunday school.
4. Evaluate both enrollment and attendance.
5. Monitor and evaluate the success of planning activities to reach people.
6. Organize the Sunday school to conduct evangelism.
7. Set accountability guidelines for teachers and leaders.

It is important to realize that Sunday school is a strategy and the strategy must be planned and implemented. The strategy should be focused on teaching and reaching people for Jesus Christ. Even though we live in the mega church age and larger churches have more services than Sunday school, Sunday school is still relevant for the 21st Century. Go out and reach people and invite them to your Sunday school. ■

## Proposed Amendment to Section 5.14 of the National Baptist Convention, USA, INC. BYLAWS

For elections for the office of President that take place after 2009, each duly qualified constituent entity shall be entitled to

Pursuant to Article VII, Section 7.2 of the Bylaws of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc., it is hereby proposed that Article V, Section 5.14 of the Bylaws, pertaining to election of the President, be amended by inserting the following provision immediately after the third sentence of the existing text:

*cast not more than five (5) votes, based on the number of years that it has been registered with the Convention since the most recent election. For the election for President to be held in 2009, each duly qualified constituent entity shall be entitled to cast no more than three (3) votes, based on the number of years it has been registered with the Convention between 2007 and the 2009 election.*

If adopted, the revised Section 5.14 will read as follows (the proposed amendment wording is italicized):

**Election of President:** Pursuant to Section 2 of Article V to the Revised Constitution, the President shall be elected by the Representative Members of the Convention at an Annual Meeting design-

ated for that purpose. No person shall be elected or serve as President who is not a member of a Constituent Member of the Convention and in good standing with the constituent entities from which that constituent membership is based (church, district association, or state convention). In all instances, any constituent entity must have registered with the Convention during one of the two most recent Annual Meetings prior to the presidential election in order for its members to cast votes during the presidential election. *For elections for the office of President that take place after 2009, each duly qualified constituent entity shall be entitled to cast not more than five (5) votes, based on the number of years that it has been registered with the Convention since the most recent election. For the election for President to be held in 2009, each duly qualified constituent entity shall be entitled to cast no more than three (3) votes, based on the number of years it has been registered with the Convention between 2006 and the 2009 election.*

All persons eligible to vote must register no later than five o'clock p.m. (5 p.m.) on Wednesday of the Annual Meeting. Voting shall take place from seven o'clock a.m. (7 a.m.) until seven o'clock p.m. (7 p.m.) on Thursday of the Annual Session and shall be conducted using electronic voting machines or other automated methods approved by the Board of Directors under conditions that protect the confidentiality of voters and the

integrity of the election process.

Election results shall be announced during the Thursday night meeting of the Annual Meeting. In the event that a sitting President is unopposed following the nomination period, the Convention shall reelect the President by acclamation (voice or standing) vote upon motion during the Thursday night meeting of the Annual Meeting. In the event of the death, incapacity, retirement, resignation, or removal from office of an unopposed sitting President during the interim between the Midwinter Meeting and the Annual Meeting, the Vice President At Large shall, pursuant to Article 5.3 herein, complete the remaining period of the unexpired term and continue to serve as President until a successor is elected at the Annual Meeting of the following year according to the nominating procedure stated in Section 5.13 herein. The Board of Directors shall prescribe the nomination, campaign, and election process, and shall be the preliminary arbiter of any election questions, disputes, or controversies, with final judgment on such matters to be made by the Convention acting as a Committee of the Whole (See Article V, Section 2 (B), Revised Constitution). Upon election as prescribed by Section 2A of Article V of the Revised Constitution, the transition procedure outlined at Section 2D of Article V of the Revised Constitution shall be observed.

Grace and Peace:

In the beginning of Isaiah's ministry, he was allowed to see a vision of God seated on the throne in Heaven. He

was allowed to witness the full Majesty of God and hear His Heavenly praise; "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty; the whole earth is full of His glory" (Isaiah 6:3). The vision of God was so pure and so holy that Isaiah was immediately confronted with His own sinful condition; "I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips" (Isaiah 6:5).

But God comforted Isaiah by letting

him know his sin had been removed; "Your guilt is taken away and your sin atoned for" (Isaiah 6:7). God had a purpose for revealing Himself to Isaiah. He was looking for a messenger to deliver His Word to the people of Israel: "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" (Isaiah 6:8).

## The Subject of Our Preaching

Rev. Al Fullwood is a Ph.D. candidate (Preaching), adjunct instructor of preaching Shaw University Divinity School Pastor of The Riley Hill Baptist Church, Wendell NC

Our conversation begins with the question: What forms the content of our preaching? This is not a language-theory question searching for "extravagant eloquence," or "speech showmanship." The question is not about preaching theory and method, showing how preaching is done in ways to best deliver the sermon. This question is biblically grounded addressing the "theological estrangement" (lack of passion for God) in our preaching. The subject of preaching is always about God and not about the preacher. Paul provides an important perspective on how to keep the Word and the preacher apart. He states, "When I came to you,

brothers, I did not come with eloquence or superior wisdom as I proclaimed to you the testimony about God. For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified" (1Cor. 2:1-2). The greatest challenge facing the pulpit today is preaching in ways which exalts the Word over the preacher.

How to preach the sermon (mechanics) should never hold importance over what (message) to preach. The business of our preaching is not narrating our biography but proclaiming God's Story. Should we have a story it is always told in the larger gospel Story. Whatever we say about ourselves should not overshadow but rest in the shadows of the cross. If we, in our preaching, cast the shadow God becomes an addendum, an attachment or even worst a footnote to the sermon. Truth is given an inferior position and subservient to our personal agenda.

In our next article we will have conversation about how preaching has gone through separation, divorcing God, and begun a courtship with entertainment.

September 20, 2007, will go down in the history books of the African American people as the day the Civil

Rights movement came out of its slumber. A beautiful day was waiting for us with a warm, bright, sun shining. Thousands of Black people, Whites and Latinos came and stood together saying loud and clear "No Justice No Peace". So many in unity, of one mind, no longer willing to just shake their heads and say "What is this world coming to?" instead, they chose to rise, taking back their power, their children, and their dignity.

I have never been in such a crowd of people and felt so much peace. Everyone looked at the other with pride. This pride was especially seen on the faces of those who brought their children along. I was privileged to be on the bus with the writers and photographer for the News and Observer. I wondered what they thought and felt as they were given a crash course of our culture, our thoughts and the ebbs and flows of our feelings as we enjoyed the long awaited moment of traveling a road that our ancestors traveled. A road that took us 15 hours away to cry out for freedom; not just for Mychal Bell, but for all who are unjustly imprisoned. The feeling cannot be described as I stepped off the bus. Feelings of gratefulness to the God who answers prayers and allowed me to see the beginning of that answer; gratefulness that I can tell the story to my grandchild and maybe he will pass it on to his children; grateful for the strength of my parents and grandparents; just plain happy to be with my people standing together in solidarity. There was also sadness in me because we were here to deal with something we should not have to deal with. There was sadness as we saw all of the stores closed with signs saying "Beware of Dog". How can one person who says they have God in their hearts mistreat another and look at them as anything but humans with human feelings.

We marched, we sang, we shouted, laughed, cried, gathered some dirt and wondered why did they have to kill the tree, then returned to our buses. The thought came, they killed the tree that was perfectly innocent but the root of the tree and the problem is still there. We stretch, rub our eyes and prepare for the journey ahead, not back to life as we knew it but looking forward and being thankful that we have waken up hearing the cry of the broken hearted, the blind the oppressed and those imprisoned waiting for us to do what Jesus would do.

The Jena 6, no matter the legal outcome, will go down in history as an example of black people organizing for a just cause.

They came on buses. They came in cars. They came in limos, they came on motorcycles. Some came alone, some with their families and some as part of a large caravan of buses. They came to rally for justice, not only for the Jena Six, but for all African Americans. Many groups had designed their own t-shirts expressing their support for the Jena Six, "Free the Jena Six," they read. But some T-Shirts sent a larger statement. I am the Jena Six," read one T-shirt that bore an image of the tree where nooses were hung after three black boys sat under Jena High School's so-called, "white tree."

September 20, 2007, was a proud day in the black community. Quoting a black reporter- "Now the only question that remains is can we get organized when the enemy is us?"

## Jena TIMELINE

1. August 31, 2006- A black student asks permission to sit under the "white tree." A school administrator replies, "you can sit wherever you want."
2. September 1, 2006- Three nooses in school colors are found hanging from the "white tree."
3. September 7, 2006- The three students responsible for hanging the nooses were found. The principal recommends them for expulsion.
4. -(no confirmed date available)- The District Attorney and several police officers came out to the school for an impromptu assembly after several reports of "trouble" at the school. The District Attorney told the students that if they didn't stop making a fuss about the "innocent prank... I can be your best friend or your worst enemy. I can take your lives away with a stroke of my pen."
5. -December 1, 2006- A black student, Robert Bailey, attends a "white party," is beaten and has a bottle broken over his head. One person was later charged with simple battery for the beating and received probation.
6. -December 2, 2006- Robert Bailey, Jr., and two others charged with battery and theft after fighting outside a store.
7. December 4, 2006- White student, Justin Barker, was allegedly with the students responsible for hanging the nooses,

saying racial slurs and taunting Robert Bailey about being beaten up at the party on December first. Later, he was knocked unconscious (either by the first punch or from hitting the ground), punched, and kicked while he was down by a group of black students. An ambulance was called. Barker was conscious by the time it arrived. He was taken to the hospital, treated and released within three hours for



injuries to his ears, face, and eyes. Barker attended a school ring ceremony later that night.

8. December 5-6, 2006- Six black students are arrested and charged with aggravated second-degree battery. They were:

9. Robert Bailey Jr, age 17. Bail amount: \$138,000.

Theo Shaw, age 17. Bail amount: \$130,000.

Carwin Jones, age 18. Bail amount: \$100,000.

Bryant Purvis, age 17. Bail amount: \$70,000.

Mychal Bell, age 16. Bail amount: \$90,000.

An unnamed minor.

10. December 7, 2006- The District Attorney announces that the charges against all six have been upgraded to attempted second-degree murder and conspiracy to commit second-degree murder.

11. December 15, 2006- It is announced that Mychal Bell, age 16, will be charged

as an adult.

12. June 25, 2007- Mychal Bell's trial begins. The District Attorney reduced the charges against Bell to second-degree aggravated battery and conspiracy to commit aggravated battery, both of which are still felonies. (In the state of Louisiana, for something to be considered aggravated battery a deadly weapon must be used. The District Attorney said the deadly weapons in this case were the shoes he was wearing.)

13. June 28, 2007- The jury deliberated for fewer than three hours and found Bell guilty on the charges of second degree battery and conspiracy to commit second degree battery. With this sentence, he could face up to 22 1/2 years in prison.

14. August 16, 2007- One of Bell's attorneys says the case should be tried in juvenile court instead of adult court.

15. September 4, 2007- A judge vacated the conspiracy to commit aggravated battery charge against Bell. It will be handled in juvenile court. The second-degree aggravated assault charge remains. Bell will now only face a maximum of 15 year in prison rather than 22 1/2.

16. -The charges against Carwin Jones and Theo Shaw were also reduced to second-degree aggravated battery and conspiracy to commit second-degree aggravated battery.

17. -September 14, 2007- A state appeals court in Louisiana throws out the only remaining conviction against Mychal Bell, saying that he should not have been tried as an adult on the charge of aggravated battery.

18. -September 20, 2007- Thousands of people from around the country, gather in Jena to take part in a rally and protest in support of the Jena 6. Rally organizers say the rally is not so much about race as it is about the unfair treatment of the young men and the handling of the "Jena 6" case.

19. -September 21, 2007- A judge denies bail for Mychal Bell, the only one of the Jena 6 still in jail. He has been in since December and will remain in jail until another hearing is held. His defense attorneys are trying to get a different judge to hear the case.

20. September, 27, 2007- Mychal Bell, 17, walks out of Court in Jena, La., after a judge order. The

district attorney said he's decided not to try Bell as an adult in the case. But he still faces trial in juvenile court.

On, June 21, 1957, Robert Thomas Young, of Georgetown, South Carolina, honored her by becoming her loving husband. They were blessed to share fifty years together.

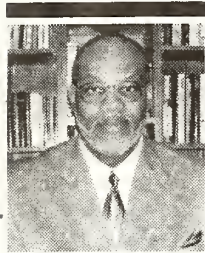

GBSC churches to keep this pressing issue before our people. By having an Anti-Crime and Incarceration Day, local churches can be informed on what pressing issues related to crime and incarceration are in your respective area of the State. The Anti-Crime and Incarceration Ministry (AIM) has launched the AIM Day initiative because crime and incarceration issues have impacted every church in the GBSC. There is no Church where a member has not experienced being the victim of a crime, a love one incarcerated, a wayward child who is at-risk, or a person returning from prison back into the community. A recent article written by Mark Early of Prison Fellowship Ministries in response to the Jena 6 situation said the following.

"The case of the Jena 6 has forced us to ask once again if our justice system is color blind in America. Thousands gathered in that small town on September 20 because they are convinced that African-Americans are unfairly treated in the criminal justice system. To be honest, it's hard to discern right now exactly what

happened in Jena. But don't miss the point here: It is not hard to discern the incredibly disproportionate rate of African-Americans behind bars in America."

This statement by Mark Early should awaken us to see our role as GBSC Churches in seeking to reach, reconcile, and restore lives impacted by crime and incarceration. Early went on to share the following statement about the disproportionate numbers of African Americans in our prisons.

"Although only 13 percent of the population, African-Americans make up nearly half of our prison population. The incarceration rate for Blacks is nearly six times that of Whites. As social scientist Glenn Loury points out, "a black male resident of the state of California is more likely to go to a state prison than a state college."

It is time for our church calendars to reflect our commitment to bring a greater awareness and response to the crime and incarceration crisis that is devastating our homes, and communities. Pastors and Moderators, I urge you to make this a priority so we as the GBSC can take AIM in reaching, reconciling and restoring human lives for Christ. HAVE AN ANTI-CRIME & INCARCERATION MINISTRY DAY NOW!

## NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST USHERS CONVENTION

(The Recommendations of the State Convention Executive Committee:  
The Established Dress Code for all Local Ushers and Nurses Aides)

1. **The dress code for all Young Adult, Adults and Senior Women Ushers:**
  - ▶ White uniforms of common styles, covering the knees, long - sleeves below elbow summer and winter, simple hair style, (requiring no bows, pins, etc.).
  - ▶ The uniform is to be worn without decorations (only the State Usher's Pin worn on the left side, over the Usher Badge. **No other decorations on uniform.**
  - ▶ On the occasion of Anniversary celebration, ushers may wear corsages, all made alike and of the same color.
  - ▶ White shoes; low to mid - height heels; white gloves; small white ear pearls; off-white stockings, no hat or headpiece.
  - ▶ Black uniforms or no other colors are **recommended** by the State Ushers Convention at anytime.
  - ▶ Two - piece white ushers, women suits, if all are made alike are acceptable but not preferred.
  - ▶ **No pant suits** are to be worn by women ushers at any of the church services.
  
2. **The dress code for children and youth ushers boys and girls should follow the above code with black, blue, and white. Top and bottoms as desired, all tops and bottoms to be uniformed, and to cover knees. No sandals.**
  
3. **THE DRESS CODE FOR MEN USHERS IN THE LOCAL CHURCH:**
  - ▶ Black or dark blue dress suits. Uniformly tailored is desired but uniform color is required for the ushering service.
  - ▶ The State Usher Pin on the left lapel, no outside fountain pins, no shoulder length hair.
  - ▶ White gloves, black shoes, socks of choice.
  - ▶ White shirt, black tie.
  - ▶ White men's dress suits, uniformly made and uniformly worn are accepted for summer wear, with white shoes and other dress code.
  - ▶ Young men and adult men should follow the men's dress code.

The generous benefactor was the late Mrs. Clara Olive York Motley, a devoted and committed member and board member of the Woman's Convention. Her final expression of love toward this Convention was included in her Last Will and Testament and executed by her beloved son, Columbus Eugene Motley, Jr.

Mrs. Motley, born March 14, 1914 and died August 27, 2006, was the daughter of the late Edward and Rosa Diggs York. Having completed her elementary and high school education, she attended Shaw University, Raleigh, and earned a B.S. Degree in Home Economics in 1936. She also did further study at N.C. State University, Raleigh, East Carolina



University, Greenville, and North Carolina A&T State University, Greensboro. As an educator, she shared her teaching ministry as a teacher and as a Home Economics agent with the N.C. State Agricultural Extension Service with whom she remained in employment until her retirement in 1976.

At an early age she received the Lord Jesus Christ as her personal Savior. She then allowed Him use her life to serve through the Sunday School, Board of Christian Education, Deaconesses (First Baptist, Powellville); Woman's Convention, Lott Carey Woman's Auxiliary, West Roanoke Missionary Woman's Auxiliary, and Bertie County Senior Citizens and others. This missionary was married to the late C.G.

Motley, Sr., a Vocational Agricultural teacher, and to this union was born a son, C.G. Motley, Jr., ***To God Be the Glory for the benefactor and her generous gift for missions-in-action!***

## 8 Reasons Why General Baptist Churches Should Support General Baptist Objectives

Eight Reasons Why General Baptist Churches Should Support General Baptist Objectives through the Baptist Headquarters*

1. That's what we were established to do. In 1867 in Goldsboro, what became known as the General Baptist State Convention was established to collect funds from the Churches to support Shaw University. The Headquarters is set up to handle these donations ... that's what we existed do!
2. Sending funds through Baptist Headquarters reduces the workload on the objectives. If 300 Churches each send a contribution directly to each of the objectives in a month, that's 300 checks to be processed, 300 receipts to be prepared, 300 letters to be mailed. If those same 300 churches sent their funds to the Headquarters, the objective has only one check to process.
3. It's the clearest way to know our Baptist witness for missions is in North Carolina. When funds for the objectives come through the Headquarters, we have the truest picture of how we support missions.

We know where the funds are coming from.

4. The Baptist Headquarters represented the Churches on the decision-making Boards of the objectives. You are represented on the Boards and decision-making groups of the objectives. It is reasonable to have someone representing the interests of the General Baptist churches when decisions are being made about how to spend the money that Churches give to objectives.

5. 100% of your contribution goes to the objectives. All of the funds collected by the Headquarters is sent to the objective intended. No administrative fee is kept by the Convention of your objective dollars. Other agencies (like the Red Cross) keep a percentage of what you send for "overhead." Not so with the GBSC.

6. Individual churches do not lose recognition for their giving when they give through the Baptist Headquarters. The Headquarters reports to the objectives the amounts that the Churches have contributed individually. Therefore, Churches may still receive recognition for their gifts; even though they send their funds through

the Baptist Headquarters.

7. The Baptist Headquarters can report to the Churches on any time period requested. Most churches operate on a calendar year (January, to December). Shaw University's and Lott Carey's fiscal years start July 1 and end June 30. National Baptist Convention's fiscal year begins June 1 and ends May 30. Central Children's Home starts October 1 and ends September 30. GBSC's fiscal year begins September 1 and ends August 31. But the GBSC has started to use software that can track contributions through any time period to be helpful to Churches.

8. We can do more to influence missions united than we can separately. While \$1,000.00 contribution from one Church is significant, just how much more significant is it when \$1,000,000.00 comes through the Baptist Headquarters.

Please prayerfully and thoughtfully and seriously consider sending your Church's support for missions (Shaw University, Shaw Divinity School, Central Children's Home, am Loft Carey Baptist Foreign Missions Convention) through the Baptist Headquarters. ■

1. **What is Campaign 750?** Campaign 750 is an effort to have 750 Churches agree to give \$100.00 each month designated for State Missions. The second part of the Campaign is to identify three (3) persons in each of the 750 Churches who will give \$10.00 each month designated for State Missions.

2. **Does my Church have to give every month?** Yes. In order for the Campaign to be successful and the necessary funds raised, each Church that enrolls will be expected to contribute each month.

3. **When are funds due?** Campaign 750 funds are due by the tenth day of each month. Please be sure that your financial staff mails your check in sufficient time to be received at the Baptist Headquarters by the tenth day of each month.

4. **Does our Church need a special form?** No. All your Church needs to do is to make a note on the check for Campaign 750 and the proper accounting of your funds will be noted.

5. **May we send our contributions for missions and objectives in the same check as Campaign 750?** PLEASE DO NOT. Please send a separate check for Campaign 750. Your funds will be deposited into a restricted account separate from the account where other monies are deposited.

6. **Can my Church pay up ahead of time?** If your Church wishes to send its funds in advance (for example, \$300.00 for a quarter), it may do so. However, Churches are encouraged to send the funds

monthly.

7. **Why is it important to send the funds monthly?** By sending funds monthly, we are much better able to budget for the Convention's expenses. We can project what we will receive each month and plan to pay the Convention's bills which are received each month.

8. **May a Church send more than \$100.00 a month?** Most certainly. The \$100.00 is the minimum amount requested. This amounts to \$25.00 a Sunday for those Churches with services every Sunday. (it's only \$12.50 a service if your Church has two services on Sunday.) Some Churches will decide to send more when thinking of their resources and blessings.

9. **What about our Church's contributions to the other objectives?** Your Church is still expected to contribute regularly to support the objectives of the Convention. The Campaign 750 donation is above and beyond what your Church is currently sending. If your Church is not supporting the Convention, Campaign 750 gives your Church a good starting point.

10. **How should we find individuals in our Church to contribute?** Whatever method you use is fine. You may solicit three people to give for an entire year. You may solicit three different people each month.

11. **How should the funds collected from individuals be sent in?** Our preference would be that the Church collect the

funds and send them along with the Church's funds once a month. However, if the individuals choose to send their contributions directly to us, please be sure that they indicate Campaign 750 on their check as well as give the name of your Church.

12. **What will be done with the funds when we send them in?** Campaign 750 funds will be deposited directly into a restricted account. As the Convention has needs to use the funds send, money will be transferred from the restricted account. By handling the funds this way, the Headquarters will be best able to account for all contributions received.

13. **What will the funds be used for?** First, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for OPERATIONS expenses. Secondly, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for PROGRAMMING expenses. Finally, the funds will be drawn upon to pay for CONVENTION DEBT TO VENDORS.

14. **How long will it take to pay off the Convention's debt?** Along with other strategies to retire our debt, it is estimated that the Convention's debt could be settled in twenty-seven (27) months if Campaign 750 is fully implemented.

15. **What will happen once the debt to vendors is paid?** The Convention will then apply funds from Campaign 750 to pay funds due to the objectives from previous fiscal years.

16. **What happens once the funds due to objectives is paid?** Once the Convention has met all of its debt obliga-

tions (both to vendors and to the objectives), the funds from Campaign 750 will be used to expand the Convention's programming and services.

17. **Will we stop enrolling Churches once 750 have enrolled?** Certainly not. We would like to see every General Baptist Church participate. 750 is a goal to work toward. We hope to exceed this goal.

18. **Could an Association or and Association Auxiliary enroll?** Yes. We would welcome the support from Associations or Auxiliaries of Associations.

19. **What if our Church loses track of our contributions?** Not a problem. You will receive a receipt and the Baptist Headquarters will be able to provide a statement of your contribution upon request.

20. **Can our Church designate where we want Campaign 750 funds applied?** No. If you wish to make a contribution for a certain reason, please do not label your funds Campaign 750. Funds for Campaign 750 will be used according to the greatest immediate need: either operations, programming, or debt reduction. You may always send a designated contribution which will be applied according to your instructions. ■

Christ. This is the season when the world celebrates Christmas and the New Year in swift succession. Special attention is given to performing acts of compassion and embracing the angelic praise of "peace on

earth among those whom God favors" (Luke 2:14, NRSV). Wouldn't it be nice if the hearts and minds of humankind were mobilized and energized to possess this mindset throughout the year?!

The world now stands in between the time when the Lord came into the world and the time when He will come again. The Lord's appearing here on that night in Bethlehem over 2,000 years ago provided a look at a policy that often plagues our world --- a policy of "no room." The savior of the world was born

in an area usually set aside for the animals. There was no room for his family in that crowded town filled with people who had complied with Caesar Augustus' decree that all inhabitants of Rome's empire be registered.

Jesus often found Himself at odds with the political and religious leaders because of His passion for God and compassion for people. He placed human needs above tradition: He crossed lines and broke down barriers that alienated people because of their race, sex, status, and religion. He advocated the inclusion of all persons. As a result, Jesus was targeted for crucifixion because the political and religious leaders had a "no room" policy --- they would not tolerate any one defying their custom whose

chief aim was to put and keep people "in their place."

Our world has a history of having a "no room" policy." Racism and sexism are twin cousins of evil that seek to oppress others simply because of their skin color or gender. Whole segments of our population are often abandoned and isolated based upon their race, gender, economic status, creed, and/or religious and political beliefs. 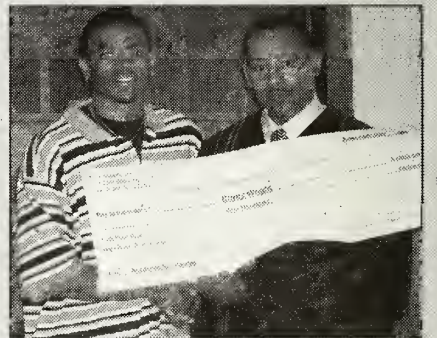

Nearly thirty-two years ago, a

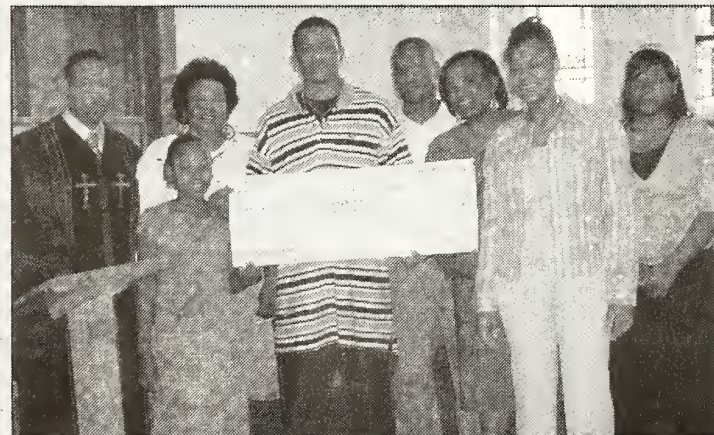
friend of this church, Mr. Jack C. Stone who happened to be a white brother, donated nearly fifteen acres of land to it. This year we were able to sell that land, and receive

a considerable return. In an effort to honor our benefactor, we as a church

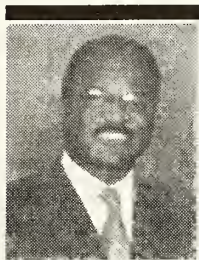


have instituted: "The Jack C. Stone Memorial Scholarship."

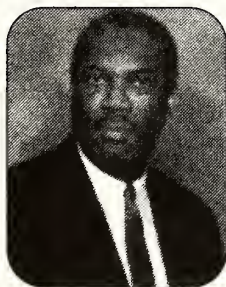

## A Simple Guide To Filling the Pulpit

First, I want to ask all of you who had the occasion to attend the Annual Session of the Convention to join with me in commending the President, the Executive Secretary and the staff for such marvelous program of inspiration and information. I have had the occasion to attend many sessions and this was one of the best. Many of you know that I was one of the challengers to President Moss for the position of President of this convention. When I ran, I stated to my wife that there were four people running for the position and only one would win. As a matter of fact, I told her that three will lose and one will win. President Moss won, and I for one, pledge to give him

my wholehearted support. I urge the churches, pastors and everyone else who is not on board to get on board and let's make this convention what it can be. Certainly President Moss is bringing forth fresh waters. We bid him God's speed.

In this article, I would like to share this with you. A couple of months ago, I was asked to assist a church that had been taken to court by the Pastor who had "resigned" or as he said "forced out." It was the Pastor's position that he was forced out and the church owed him for three months' salary. Of course, the church's position was that he left on his own and that the church was not obligated to compensate him for three months' salary.

This case was moving through the legal system after having been filed a couple of years ago. It had now reached the point where the Pastor and the church were required to participate in mediation. I was contacted to assist the church in this mediation process. Legal fees in this

matter for just one of the parties at the stage of mediation had already exceeded \$10,000.00. The judge did not want to hear the case, as in most church matters. The courts would prefer that these matters be settled prior to court.

I am sharing this because as I sat there watching the former Pastor and this church negotiate back and forth over what amount the Pastor is entitled to with their lawyers, it created an eerie feeling in my spirit. The money that was spent for legal fees, court costs, mediation fees, etc. could have very well gone for ministry. It could have gone to State Missions, Shaw University, Central Children Home, Lott Carey, etc. It made me reflect on one of my decisions that I have now concluded was not of sound judgment.

The point that I make to our Pastors and churches is that in matters of conflict, it would best serve all parties to seek a way to solve the issues without resorting to court action. Remember,

there is a better alternative.

## Dr. David C. Forbes Leads Revival

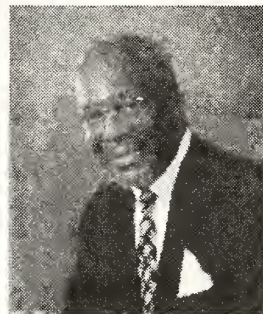
One of the GBSC's leading senior Pastors, the Reverend Dr. David C. Forbes, Sr., of Christian Faith Baptist Church (CFBC) in Raleigh, N.C., led a four day (November 1-4) revival at Raleigh's Central Prison. The revival required Dr. Forbes to preach daily to both the general and death row populations which concluded with a Communion Service on Sunday morning. Central Prison is the state's largest maximum security prison. The inmates' pastoral care needs are met by two full-time state Chaplains, Senior Chaplain Randall Speer and Chaplain Bob

Montgomery. Dr. Forbes has been a long time supporter of in-prison ministry and this would be his third time leading the annual revival services. These revival services are a highlight each year for the "Church" at Central Prison.

One of the men on "Life Row", as CFBC calls it, wanted to join Christian Faith Baptist Church because of the great love and compassion he received through the ministry of Pastor Forbes. He is now a disciple under the pastoral covering of Dr. Forbes. CFBC calls death row "Life Row" because Jesus Christ is there in Central Prison and wherever Jesus is there is spiritual life. Dr. Forbes also led a weekly Bible study at Central

Prison for almost two years in carrying out the Great Commission of going into all the world to make disciples.

Under Dr. Forbes' leadership, CFBC has supported Project Nehemiah (a re-entry program) at Raleigh's Wake Correctional Center, where Deacon Ray Scott has provided leadership for over 10 years. Also each year, the CFBC Prison ministry under the direction of Deacon Cecilia Walton has participated in the Angel Tree program (at-risk youth ministry) which supplies gifts at Christmas time and summer camping opportunities to the children of inmates. CFBC under the leadership of Pastor

## Preaching As Entertainment

During the classical period of ancient Greece a group known as Sophists perfected the art of speech writing and public speaking. Central to their study was rhetoric which is defined as the skill of using language and speech effectively or persuasively. Sophists were experts, professors, teachers and an authority on presenting arguments. They earned a reputation of "extravagant displays of language and for astonishing audiences with their brilliant styles . . . colorful appearances and flamboyant personalities." Frequently, a Sophist as professional orator would offer his services for pay, generally for legal purposes or entertainment in the public square. They razz led and dazzled the audience with their mastery of persuasive discourse.

The Sophists became controversial for several reasons, particularly for their view of truth. For them, truth was not found in transcendent

sources (God); rather truth emerged out of charisma of the speaker and a "clash of arguments." The essence of their thinking suggests that the meaning of life (reality) is linguistically (persuasive power of words) oriented, rather than objective truth. In other words, skillful Sophists became the source of true as opposed to being tool or bearer of truth. In this sense truth is not transcendent but subjective invention.

There is a sense that we (preachers) are becoming modern day Sophists, concerned about the use of flattering words in our pulpit discourse as opposed to gospel truth. The intent is to entertain an audience that would rather have amusing discourse than preaching that "convicts, converts and subverts." With our "platform grandstanding and showmanship" adorned in polished rhetoric, we preach to etching ears rather than wounded hearts. At the end of the day preaching becomes an act of entertainment in the interest of delighting the audience. We "dressed up truth" with lavish garments of eloquence and style that turns into something else. For the character of our preaching is not in amusing the hearers but amending them.

Our conversation regarding preaching as entertainment will continue in the next article. ■

## Former Sheriff John Baker Dies at 72

Former Sheriff John Baker Dies at 72. Former NFL defensive lineman John H. Baker Jr. died Wednesday, October 31, 2007, his son said. He was 72. Baker died at his home Wednesday morning after a long illness, said officials at the Haywood Funeral Home in Raleigh.

He leaves behind his wife, Juanita, of almost 50 years, two children and four grandchildren.

Baker attended North Carolina Central on a football scholarship before spending 11 years in the NFL with the Los Angeles Rams, Pittsburgh Steelers and Detroit Lions.

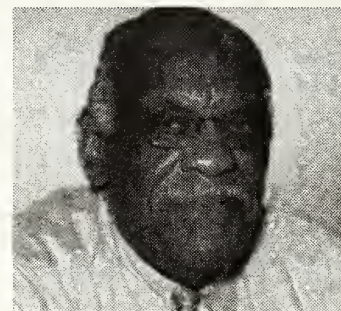
He may be best known for his 1964 tackle of New York Giants quarterback Y.A. Tittle, who was photographed sitting bloody in the end zone, according to Baker's citation in the Raleigh Hall of Fame.

In the offseason, Baker worked with the Raleigh police department as a youth counselor. When he left the NFL and returned to his hometown, he became the first black appointed to the state Parole Board, where he served eight years until being elected Wake County sheriff in 1978. Baker served in

the post for 24 years, until he was defeated in 2002.

Baker and his late father, who was Raleigh's first black police officer, were inducted into the city's Hall of Fame this year. Baker became a member of the state's Sports Hall of Fame in 1972.

During his tenure as sheriff, Baker helped create a program that allowed young jailed offenders to continue their education at the John H. Baker Jr. Charter School.

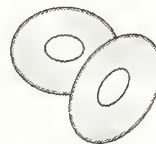

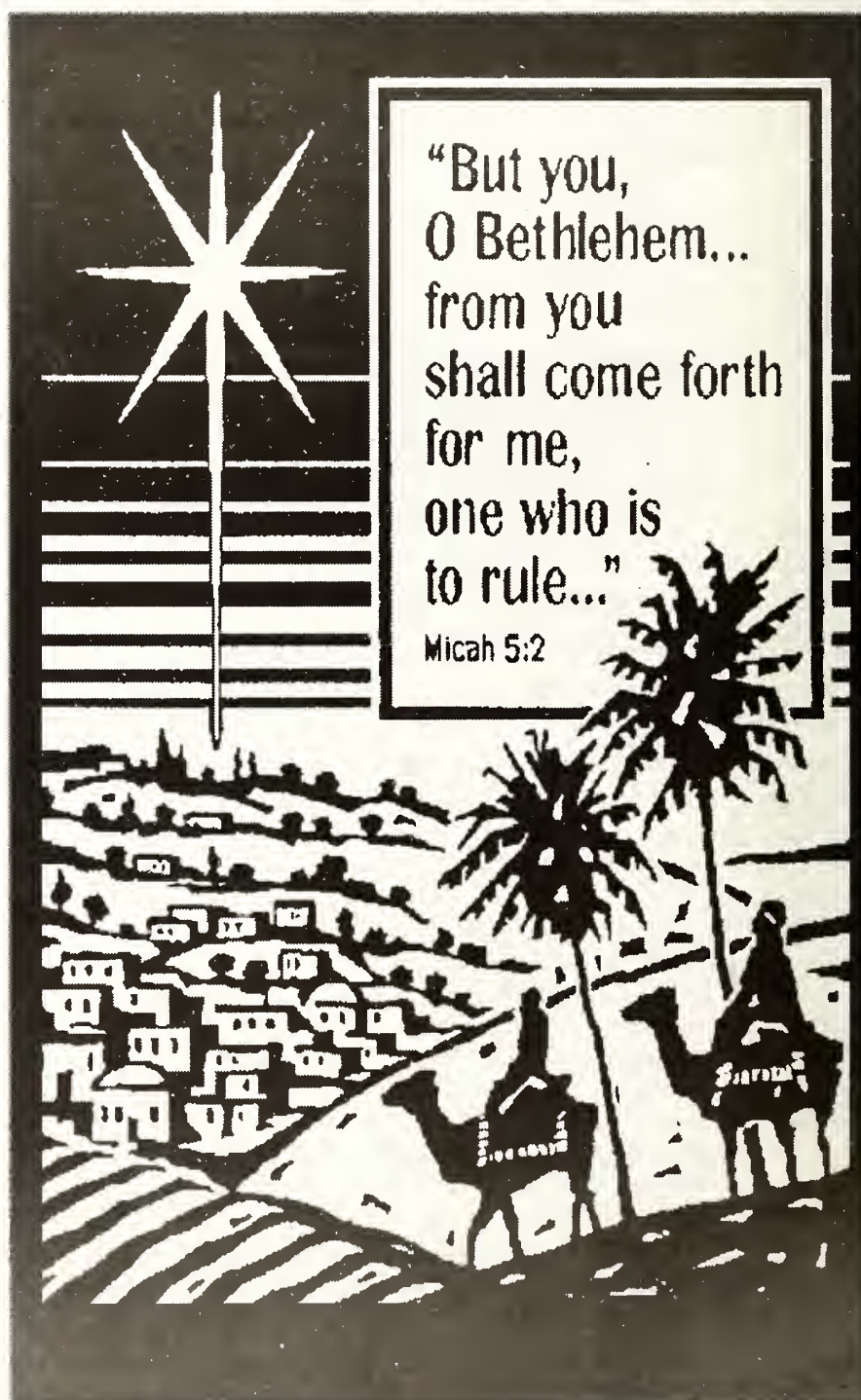
