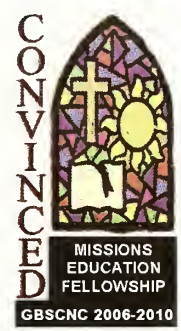

"To the [General Baptist Family] of God in [North Carolina], to those sanctified in Christ Jesus and called to be holy, together with all those everywhere who call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ... Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 1:2-3, NIV).

Jesus declared to His disciples in Matthew 5:14: "You are the light of the world." Jesus also promised His disciples they would receive God's power to accomplish what no other power on earth could do (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4, 8). Through them, God's power would provide light to a world that was bound by the darkness of lesser powers. ## How Should the Church Respond?

Churches need to keep a long-term perspective during this recession and not overreact to the short-term situation. The economy will always be cyclical, but the Church must always hold firm to its God-given vision and not make compromises that will impact future ministry. For whatever reason, God allows circumstances to arise that impact the timelines we have established. We should not be anxious during these times, but we should move as God allows.

A church building project – from dream to dedication day – is quite often a three-year process. If a church is growing today, but does nothing during the current economic cycle, it will lose two years in the process – meaning it could be five years before any new facility is completed. Now is a great time, with minimal investment required, for a growing church to begin developing a strategic plan for a building project that includes a thorough review of the space and financial planning. When this strategic planning is complete, then the church can begin the actual design process. By the time all of this is done, the current economic cycle will most likely be in recovery, and the church will be in a place to

take advantage of better lending availability and begin construction without delay. This will allow new facilities to be completed at an earlier date and reduce the likelihood that space needs will limit the growth of the church.

Additionally, as churches develop strategic plans, they need to approach the next few years with a conservative fiscal model that provides flexibility in case projections do not meet expectations. Churches that have established strong cash positions will be able to take advantage of lower land prices and reduced construction costs. Other churches may need to defer construction until the economy rebounds.

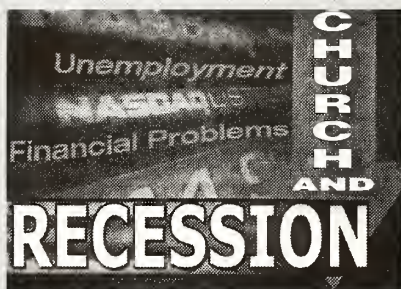
Regardless, all churches need to be planning for the unplanned. Despite predictions and forecasts, none of us really knows what to expect in the next couple of years. Churches must be very conservative as they commit to major projects. They should not make any assumptions regarding the availability of financing and should assume that capital campaign collections could be 10 percent – 20 percent less than historical trends. Even some churches that have been able to obtain construction financing have discovered

that their lenders have been unwilling to provide permanent financing when construction was completed – which in some cases results in foreclosure.

As has been the case in all previous recessions, those churches that have placed themselves in a strong cash position are able to benefit during tough times. Those that are not as financially strong need to focus on reducing costs and eliminating as much debt as possible in order to weather the storm. The upside for churches is that God possesses unlimited resources and is able to provide as he determines. This is a wonderful time for churches to model good stewardship and look to the Lord through prayer. What a confirmation it is to the vision of the church to see God miraculously provide resources so that vision can be realized. At the same time, we should not assume upon his generosity, but rather wait on his timing.

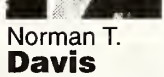

**Why Has This Change Occurred?**

For the last decade, housing prices across the country have risen rapidly. Young families who previously could not enter the housing market were able to buy homes under new lending programs that required little documentation with little or no money down. The perfect storm hit when those loans matured and were recalculated to much higher rates at the same time that property values were dropping. ## What to Do If You Are Laid Off

appreciate that you have a job that allow you to support your family. If that means your family needs to get by on less income, well, that's just another reality to face in 2009.

**ISSUE:** You are worried you may lose your job in 2009.

**ACTION:** Prepare for it.. I would not be surprised to see unemployment rise to 8% or even 9%.

The best way to protect your family is to know that you will still be able to pay the bills while you look for a new job. Because of the weak economy, that could take longer than you may think. That is why it is imperative that you build an emergency savings account that can cover your family's living expenses for eight months. I know that is a lot, but you have got to start saving as much as you can right now. I want to make sure you are up to speed on the fact that you made not be able to tap your credit card or a home equity line of credit to pay your family's bill in the event you are laid off. Lenders are not in the lending mood these days. I cannot be more emphatic: You must have savings set aside to be truly safe in 2009

**ISSUE:** You plan to make early withdrawals from your 401(k) if you are laid off and can't pay your bills.

**ACTION:** Try hard not to touch your retirement savings. What seems like reasonable action to help you get

through problems today will devastate your long-term security. You need that money for retirement; spend it today and

you will have less tomorrow. And don't tell me you will worry about it later, or you will boost your savings when you get another job. Even the best of

intentions to make up for the withdrawals can run into harsh realities: Your next job may not pay enough to allow you to save to make up for your early withdrawal. There is one important action I want you to take with your 401(k) if you are laid off in 2009: Roll over the money into an IRA at a brokerage or mutual-fund company. Rolling your money into an IRA gives you access to the best low-cost mutual funds and ETFs (exchange-traded funds), rather than limiting yourself to the investment choice in your 401(k). And because of the steep market declines, if you qualify to roll over your money into a Roth IRA in 2009, you will get a great tax break.

**ISSUE:** You don't have money to set aside in savings.

**ACTION:** Get serious about finding ways to come up with real savings — right now. This is nonnegotiable: You will build up a savings reserve. You and

your family can (and must) adjust to the new realities of 2009 to find ways to reduce your expenses — or increase your income — so you have money to put toward important financial goals.

And in 2009, there is nothing more important than building an emergency savings fund that can carry your family for eight months.

You also want to start your job hunt right now — while you still have your

current job. Network like crazy, show up at industry conferences, and take a look at job postings in your field. If there is any specific skill mentioned that you are not up to speed on, get yourself schooled on it ASAP. In a slow economy, employers won't hire someone who meets 80% of their needs; they have such a large pool to chose from that they can find the person who meets 100% of their needs. Make sure that person is you.

**ISSUE:** You figure you will get by on unemployment benefits if you are laid off.

**ACTION:** You will still need to supplement that money with your own savings. The reality is that your maximum unemployment benefit typically will replace less than 50% of your lost wages. There is also a time limit to those payouts; 26 weeks is the standard amount of time you are eligible to collect unemployment. In harsh economic times, Congress can vote to expand the benefit period for an additional 13 weeks. (Unemployment is handled by your state, based on general standards set by federal law.) To find out your state's rules, go to [www.servicelocator.org](http://www.servicelocator.org) and click on the "Find Unemployment Insurance Filing Assistance" link on the left side of the page

**ISSUE:** There are so many bargain foreclosures for sale, but home prices keep falling. For whom is it a good idea to buy a house?

**ACTION:** If you do not have 20 percent to put down, if you do not have a high (credit) score of 700 and above, if you cannot afford a 30-year fixed mortgage including property tax and insurance; if you don't have, on top of the down payment, an eight-months emergency fund, you should not buy a house. ■

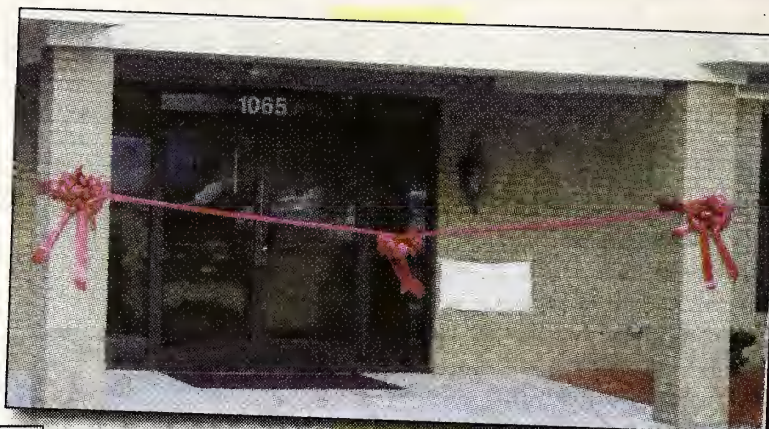

## How Long Will This Situation Last?

Analysts at a recent conference of the California

### Part 1

#### Introduction

What will it take for the local church to meet the growing challenges and needs presented by our corrupting American culture? Where must Christians look to find the answers to our deepest desires and concerns in our efforts to grow in Christ? When will our society experience a greater impact and witness from the followers of Christ? These questions beg for answers that can come from only one place in the church. The answers are found with the leadership of the church. Church leadership is the essential aspect of church life that has been put in place to provide the leadership required for such a critical time in our society. Our times are crying out for solutions to the declining spiritual, economic, moral, social, and environmental aspects of our American culture. How can the church make a greater difference in reaching, reconciling, and restoring human lives? It begins with church leadership. George Barna, a leading Christian researcher has done a lot to help the local church understand our plight today. Barna writes, "Most Christians try to have a positive impact upon society and individuals. The big question is whether what they are doing is working. If the conclusion is that their efforts are not producing the desired outcomes, then the big challenge is whether they are willing to change their strategies to maximize their potential." Barna makes a case for the necessity of strategic changes if we assess that our efforts are not producing the desired outcomes.

One critical role of church leadership must be to assess and evaluate the life and ministry of the local church. A careful assessment and evaluation of the local church as a whole in America today reveals we are not having the desired effective impact on our society. The influence of the local church in our society is waning. We begin to lose our influence when church leaders are

no longer prioritizing the critical importance of fulfilling the Great Commission of Matthew 28:18-20.

The Great Commission is the last direct marching order Jesus gave to the initial church leadership. The core of the Great Commission is to make disciples of all nations.

Biblical discipleship is the divine methodology Jesus Christ utilized in His earthly ministry. Bill Hull writes, "Jesus' words reveal His heart and priority. They also indicate the method that will fulfill God's plan to rescue the world. A commitment to be and make disciples must be the central act of every disciple and every church." What happens in a church where the Great Commission is not a priority for the leaders? The results are devastating to the life and mission of the church. When making disciples is not being done, a local church will never reach their God-desired potential. The lead-

ers and local church settle for a superficial form of Christianity that may have the outward expressions of vitality, but no power to make an impact in their personal lifestyles or communities.

There is only one place to start turning a local church back in the right direction.

The change must start with every church leader personally embracing the Great Commission in order to be a disciple. Greg Ogden writes, "The first cause of the low estate of discipleship is that pastors have been diverted from their primary calling to equip the saints for the work of ministry." How can this happen when the Word of God is so clear about a leader's primary responsibility is to make disciples (Ephesians 4:11)? In lieu of this, let's examine what kinds of leaders are needed at this time to lead the church in spiritual growth, worship, stewardship, worship, and missions.
