## 'Power Sundays' Unite Churches to Fight Strokes

More than 20 Charlotte-area African-American churches recently participated in the Power To End Stroke, an education and awareness campaign created to reduce stroke and the risk of stroke. Coordinated by the American Stroke Association, a division of the American Heart Association, one of the main objectives of the campaign is to raise critical awareness within the African-American population, where heart disease and stroke are major health risks. Blacks have almost twice the risk of first-ever strokes compared to whites, and the prevalence of high blood pressure in African-Americans is the highest in the world.

To lead these awareness efforts, the Charlotte Region Power to End Stroke Task Force was created, chaired by Dr. Patrick Graham, CEO and president of the Charlotte Urban League. In March, 45 pastors and church leaders, representing 22 churches, attended a pastor training and breakfast to equip them with the tools and knowledge to lead the Power To End Stroke campaign's "Power Sundays" that would be held over the following two months. All 22 churches in attendance committed to host a Power Sunday or Power Event at their church between April 1 and May 31.

Participating churches included: New Emmanuel Congregational, Pleasant Hill BC, Unity Fellowship of Charlotte, Grier Heights Presbyterian, New Life Fellowship of Charlotte, Pleasant Grove Methodist, Jerusalem Holiness, East Stonewall AME Zion, Meeting Place,

On June 18, the American Stroke Association held a "Hats Off To You" awards dinner to recognize the pastors and many other community leaders who helped make the program a success. Organizers want you to know these key messages from the Power To End Stroke campaign:

- In most cases stroke is not inevitable. You can prevent it.
- African-Americans are at higher risk for stroke.
- Know your risk. Control your blood pressure and diabetes to prevent stroke.
- Work with a healthcare provider to manage your risk.

## Shaw University Names First Female President

Shaw University has named Dr. Dorothy Cowser Yancy as its interim president, making her the first female to hold that position in the school's 144-year history. She replaces Clarence Newsome, who resigned from his presidency in May.

Dr. Yancy has plenty of experience at historically black colleges and universities, having served 14 years as president of Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte before retiring in 2008, and a term as president of the 12-member Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association board (CIAA). She'll now be in charge of leading Shaw, but is expected to only hold the

post for about a year to allow the university time to find a permanent president and so that she can return to retirement.

She'll be looked upon to use her fundraising prowess as Shaw University is reported to be more than \$20 million in debt. Shaw's Board of Trustees say they have confidence that she can help them turn things around at the 2,700-student university. During her tenure at Johnson C. Smith, Dr. Yancy raised more than \$145 million and more than tripled the endowment from \$14 million to \$53

million.

Dr. Yancy holds a bachelor's degree in history and social science from Johnson C. Smith, a master's degree in history from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, and a doctorate in political science from Atlanta University. In 2008, she was inducted into the Women's History Hall of Fame by the National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs and the Levine Museum of the New South.

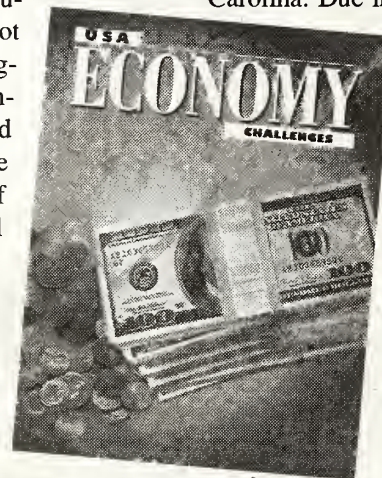
ministry by these auxiliaries.

The late Dr. Edward Victor Hill, former pastor of the Mount Zion Baptist Church in Los Angeles, California, was noted for often saying there were three books the church needed to carry out its kingdom mandate: the good book (Bible), the hymn book, and the pocketbook.

Throughout His earthly ministry, Jesus used parables to illustrate the kingdom of God. Jesus emphasized the stewardship of material possessions in 16 of the 38 parables in the

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**The Good that Can Come from Pain**

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No question about it, the hope of the glory of God sometimes seems far, far away! Paul anticipated this reaction in the Roman Christians so he addressed and attacked the problem at

its heart. How are we to enjoy peace with God and to rejoice in our hope if we must suffer the pain and trouble that comes in this life? Paul wrote that as God's redeemed people, we rejoice in our sufferings, because they are productive within our lives.

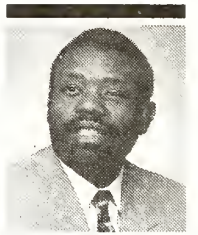
Someone has said that suffering is always bitter and that suffering that is unjust is doubly bitter. But life is like

that. Nothing in scripture hints that we Christians should expect life to be easier, more antiseptic, or safer. We need a mature awareness of the contributions of pain, as outlined by Dr. Brand, and we need the courage to cling to God despite the world of pain and sometimes because of it.

Even where pain seems to us to have no useful quality, we can recall that Jesus identified himself fully with those who suffered. When he became a man, he acted completely as one of us. He was born in poverty—that is pain; he died in disgrace—that is pain; and he counted it well worthwhile! If the Christ of our faith was made perfect through suffering, we should not be surprised that God's grace can and does bring us to a higher maturity through the hardest experience of life.

For many Christians, a favorite passage affirms this same theme: "We know that in everything God works for

good with those who love Him, who are called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28). Paul did not say, as is sometimes mistakenly supposed, that all things are good, that they work out for good for everybody, or even that God causes every event to

happen. These things are surely not true. Paul did mean in Romans 8:28 and in verses 3-4 of chapter 5 that God has a way of taking the coarsest or the best things that happen to the per-

son who is in right relation with him and building through such experiences the kind of life that possesses an endurance and character akin to that of Jesus Christ.

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## Raleigh Native Commemorated on U.S. Postage Stamp

The U.S. Postal Service has honored the late Anna Julia Cooper by making her the 32nd inductee into the Black Heritage Series. The educator, scholar, and activist, who died in 1964, is credited for being a strong voice for African-Americans from the end of slavery to the beginning of the Civil Rights Movement. She was immortalized on postage on June 11 and a dedication ceremony was held in Washington, D.C. at the school where she once taught and served as principal.

Anna Julia Haywood was born into slavery around 1858 in Raleigh. She displayed a great thirst for knowledge during her childhood and is said to have stated early on that she wanted to become a teacher. In 1868, she received a scholarship to enter the inaugural class at St. Augustine's Normal School and Collegiate Institute (now known as St. Augustine's College), a local school for African-Americans. She earned part of her tuition by tutoring fellow students, and she continued to teach at St. Augustine's after graduating in 1877. That year she married George A.C. Cooper, who was studying for the ministry at St. Augustine's. George died unexpectedly two years later.

Cooper went on to earn a mathematics degree

from Oberlin College in Ohio in 1884, becoming one of the first African-American women to graduate from the school. She returned to Raleigh and taught math, Greek, and Latin at St. Augustine's until 1887, when she was invited to teach math and science at the Preparatory High School for Colored Youth (today known as Dunbar High School) in Washington, D.C., the largest and most prestigious public high school for African-Americans in the nation.

In 1892, Cooper published *A Voice from the South by a Black Woman of the South*, a groundbreaking collection of essays and speeches that she is perhaps most known for. It was the first book-length volume of black feminist analysis in the United States, covering a variety of topics including race relations, poverty, and gender inequality.

She went on to teach at a number of schools and colleges before retiring in 1940. She continued to give lectures, publish essays, and be active in her community until she died at her home in Washington, D.C. in 1964. She is buried next to her husband in Raleigh.

The 44-cent First-Class Anna Julia Cooper commemorative stamp features a portrait of her created by artist Kadir Nelson, who based his painting on an undated photograph. A total of 125 million stamps

## New Study Provides Insight Into Megachurches

There seems to often be confusion between what's fact and what's fiction when it comes to details surrounding many of this country's megachurches. Two organizations got together to find out the truth behind the numbers. Leadership Network and Hartford Seminary's Hartford Institute for Religion Research have released the National Survey of Megachurch Attenders, the largest national representative study of megachurch attendees to date. Conducted from January to August 2008, the survey is based on responses from 24,900 worshippers at 12 megachurches across the United States. Additional site visits, interviews, staff surveys, and other data-collection procedures also contributed to the findings.

The published study, titled "Not Who You Think They Are: The Real Story of People Who Attend America's Megachurches," shows largely that megachurch attendees are a distinct group of people who create their own, customized spiritual experiences through the multitude of ministry choices and diverse avenues for involvement that megachurches offer.

Among the most significant discoveries from the study are:

-Nearly two-thirds of megachurch attendees are

under 45 years old, as compared to only one-third for all protestant churches (62 percent versus 35 percent).

-Nearly a third of megachurch attendees are single, unmarried persons. In a typical church, singles account for just 10 percent of the congregation.

-Megachurch attendees are both more educated and more affluent than attendees at other churches.

-The majority of megachurch attendees are not necessarily new to Christianity, but nearly a quarter had not recently been in another church before coming to a megachurch.

-While newcomers almost always attend a megachurch at the invitation of family, friends, or co-workers, the real attraction tends to be the church's reputation, worship style, and senior pastor.

-Long-term attendance flows from an appreciation for the church's music, arts, social, and community outreach, and adult-oriented programs.

-45 percent of megachurch attendees never volunteer at the church.

Many churches can glean useful information from the results of this study. Megachurches can evaluate how to improve on how it is connecting with attendees. While smaller, more traditional churches can evaluate the findings to determine how to reach more people who fall within the demographic of megachurch attendees.

The file and information should be emailed to [sermons@christianarchives.org](mailto:sermons@christianarchives.org), and the submission deadline is July 31.

Christian Archives was developed by a small group of Christians who recognized that many inspirational sermons, once given, were essentially lost. Even if recorded or videotaped, these sermons were often saved on tape, CD, or even DVD and gathering dust on a shelf somewhere, never to be

heard again. Christian Archives offers a solution to that problem with its free Internet-based service that allows churches the ability to store and access millions of digital, audio, and video sermon files online, at any time.



"If sharing and inspiring through a sermon works well one day a week, then why not make that same sermon available seven days a week?" asks Dallen Wendt, co-founder of Christian Archives. "Better yet, why not make that sermon available to any Christian online? That is why we created Christian Archives."

In addition to sermon archiving, Christian Archives also provides a custom web page for church members at no cost. Each custom web page is home to the archives of the specific church. The custom web page makes it easy for churches to seamlessly link their websites to their archives, and back again. If a church does not have a website they can also use their custom web page as their website.

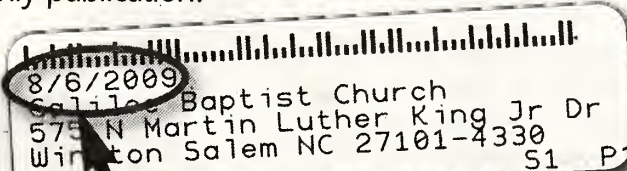
