God be the glory." Congratulations to Dr. Brodie in her retirement!

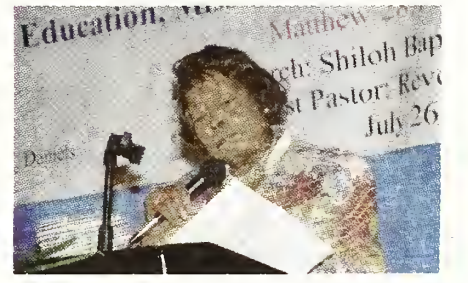

Hurricane Katrina devastated the Gulf Coast four years ago. I left New Orleans just a few days before landfall and within a few days following, Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention was communicating throughout our network to help move supplies to Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas. You

Our primary focus, however, was not on the immediate relief efforts. We concentrated on "helping people rise again." As a result of your generosity, we collaborated in the region to provide pastoral care ministry, social service support, mental health counseling,

lion gift from Fountain Baptist Church in Summit, New Jersey, enabled us to build on the previous work by nurturing families, churches, and communities. We have, and continue to, provide scholarships to adults for skills training

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# World Council of Churches Makes New Call for Peace in Darfur

The World Council of Churches Central Committee again took up the issue of Sudan at meetings recently in Geneva, issuing a statement on the Darfur crisis in the context of Sudan. The statement says since early 2003 "the conflict in Darfur has unleashed an overwhelming wave of violence resulting in the death of hundreds of thousands of civilians and an immense humanitarian crisis."

The central committee and its executive committee have spoken several times previously on Sudan and the conflict in the nation's Darfur region. In September 2006, the central committee requested that staff study whether "the use of the term genocide with regard to the crisis in Darfur is appropriate in light of the internationally agreed conventions on this issue, and to offer counsel to the churches."

A progress report on that study was attached to this latest statement as background, referring to the conflict in Darfur as a moral challenge for the international community. The new statement adopted by cen-

tral committee delegates on September 1 condemns the mass atrocities committed against innocent civilians in Darfur. It further urges the government of Sudan to assume full responsibility for the protection



of its citizens regardless of ethnicity or other affiliation and to allow uninterrupted humanitarian assistance to reach all suffering people in Darfur.

It also appeals to the government of Sudan to honor all statements and agree-

ments it has signed, most notably the Comprehensive Peace Agreement signed with the Sudan People's Liberation Movement/Army in 2005 in the country's South. It urges the nations of Africa and the

international community to continue to support the peace process through constructive dialogue with all parties involved in the conflict.

The statement goes on to express appreciation for the assistance provided by the

United Nations/African Union (UNAMID) peacekeeping force in Darfur and acknowledges the "significant role of the churches in Sudan in promoting interreligious dialogue and advocating for peace, justice, reconciliation, and respect for the dignity and well being of all the people of Sudan."

It ends by encouraging Christians everywhere to pray for an end to the hostilities in Darfur and for a lasting peace in Sudan, with the following prayer:

Compassionate God, who through the death of your Son on the cross, suffers alongside wounded humanity. We remember communities and peoples around the world who have been victims of genocide and mass crimes against humanity. (The names of specific communities and peoples could be inserted here.) Comfort those who mourn. Sustain those who live with the scars of violence. Bless all who work for truth, reconciliation, and the healing of memories. In your name we pray.

## New Study Shows How the Faith of African-Americans Has Changed

From the earliest days of America's history, a deep-rooted spirituality has been one of the hallmarks of the black population in the country. A new study released by The Barna Group underscores that the passage of time has not diminished the importance of faith in the lives of African-Americans. The study examined the religious beliefs and behaviors of the black population, today and in comparison to 15 years ago, as well as comparing the faith of blacks to that of the U.S. population as a whole.

The research explored 12 religious beliefs. The current data indicates that among the four largest ethnic groups in the nation—whites, blacks, Hispanics, and Asians—blacks had the highest score on 10 of the 12 belief indicators. Survey respondents reacted to nine statements regarding faith. Blacks were highest among the four ethnic groups in relation to eight of those nine statements. (See the chart on this page for a breakdown of responses.) The only faith statement for which the African-American response was similar to that of the U.S. average was "if a person is generally good, or does enough good things for others during their life, they will earn a place in Heaven."

There were three other belief oriented results in the survey, and African-Americans were the highest ethnic group on two of those three. Specifically, blacks were the group most likely to be born again Christians (59 percent compared to a national average of 46 percent) and were the ethnic segment most likely to consider themselves to be Christian (92 percent did so, versus 85 percent nationally). However, they were no more likely than average to qualify as evangelical Christians.

The Barna study examined 13 religious behaviors. Again demonstrating their spiritual uniqueness, African-Americans ranked highest among the four ethnic groups on eight of those 13 indicators and lowest on two of them. In all, blacks differed significantly from the national average on nine of the behaviors.

Compared to the other three ethnic groups, blacks emerged as the most likely to engage in each of five church-related activities in a typical week (attending church services, participating in a small group, attending a Sunday school class, praying, and reading the Bible). They were also the most likely to have made a personal commitment to Jesus Christ that is still important in their life and to have an "active faith" (i.e., attend church services, pray to

God, and read from the Bible during the week). They also had the lowest proportion of unchurched adults and were the ethnic group least likely to be Catholic.

Religious behaviors and choices among blacks that occur at levels equivalent to the national average are being "absolutely committed to the Christian faith" and having shared one's faith in Christ with others during the past year.

The Barna study compared current statistics for African-American faith with that measured 15 years ago and found substantial change during that period. Six of seven measures of belief had changed significantly. Blacks today are more likely than they were in the early 1990s to believe that the principles taught in the Bible are totally accurate; to say that their religious faith is very important in their life; to have a biblically orthodox understanding of the nature of God; and to be born again. They are also less likely to strongly

affirm that Satan is symbolic, not real; and to contend that a good person can earn his/her way into Heaven. The measure that had not changed was the sense of personal responsibility to discuss their beliefs with others.

The African-American population is presently about 15 percent of the national population. Other research conducted by Barna has indicated that spirituality is generally a more central element in the lives of blacks than in the lives of people from other ethnic groups. That spiritual emphasis accounts for some of the higher levels of religious activity and the more biblically oriented beliefs registered within the black community.

While the beliefs and behaviors of America's white population have changed little since the early 1990's, the new research underscored that the faith of African-Americans is dynamic, gen-

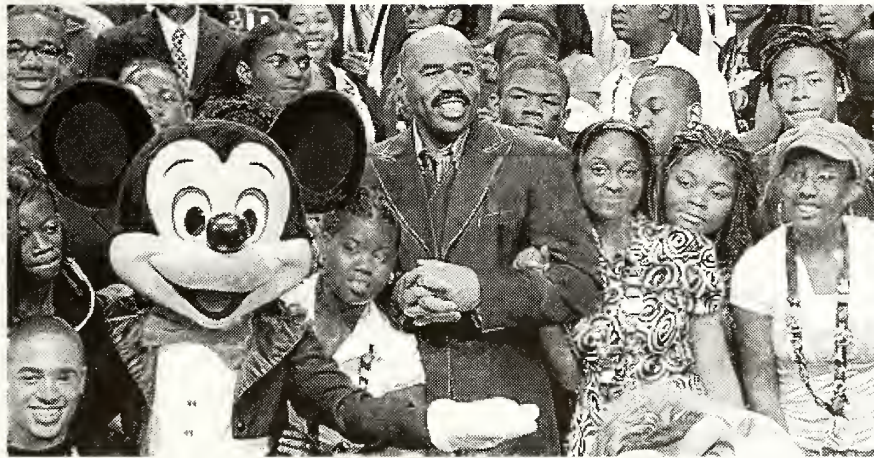

"To all (in the General Baptist family) who are loved by God and called to be saints: Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 1:7). ## The Aging Church

The U.S. Census Bureau's 1990 report is a wake up call for the church. In 1990, adults 65 years old or older made up 4 percent of the population; Americans 85 and older numbered 3.1 million. A child born in 1900 could expect to live to be around 50 years of age. Since 1900, the number of Americans 65 or older has increased 10 times and the percentage of the population has tripled. They now represent 12.6 percent of the U.S. population, or about one in every eight Americans.

A child born in 1990 can expect to live 75 years. The 85-plus age group had the largest percentage increase of all groups—25 times larger than this age group in 1900. By 2050, their number will approach 18 million, almost 5 percent of the population. Some states will

experience 100 percent growth in senior adult population between 1995 and 2020. Before 1996, the senior adult segment of this country's population exhibited slow, steady growth. When baby boomers started turning 50 in 1996, growth began to escalate.

As a result of aging boomers, it is predicted that by the year 2030 persons 65 and older will represent 21.8 percent of the U.S. population. The most rapid increase in numbers is expected between the year 2010 and 2030 when the last of the baby boomer generation reaches age 65. By 2025, the 65-plus population will outnumber teenagers by two to one. What a shift this will be from the youth focused culture of the 1990s.

By 2040, life expectancy will increase to age 86 for men and 91 for women. By 2050, the percentage of the U.S. population over the age of 65 will reach 22 percent. Entire communities and churches will consist of senior adults.

Stereotypes and myths about senior adults persist despite evidence to the contrary. The image of persons 65 and older as frail, hard of hearing, nearsighted, passive, and docile may characterize some seniors; but for the most part they are very alert, active, and eager to learn.

They travel, volunteer, and lead independent lives with a measure of financial security unknown to previous generations. Instead of being cared for by family members, many in this age group are caregivers for adult children and grandchildren.

Older Americans are generally healthier and more independent than their predecessors. Only 5 percent live in long-term care facilities, while 67 percent live in family settings either in their own homes or with a relative. For today's seniors, these years are among their most creative and productive. They're concerned with maintaining a sense of meaning and purpose for their lives. A total of 81 percent of seniors 65 to 69 are homeowners, while 75 percent of those 75 and older own homes.

The attitude that senior adults are productive and valued leaders is very much a biblical concept. The fact that we're made in the image of God reveals our importance to God. (See Genesis 1:27). As we age we do not diminish in our worth to God or to mankind. The Bible speaks clearly to five beliefs about aging:

-Aging has a purpose and is a normal part of life. "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under Heaven: a time to be born and

a time to die" (Eccl. 3:1-2).

-Seniors deserve our honor, respect, and recognition. "Honor your father and mother which is the first commandment with a promise that it may be well with you and that you may enjoy long life on the earth" (Ephesians 6:2-3).

-Aging provides experience, knowledge, and wisdom, which serve as examples of a worthy life. "Is not wisdom found among the aged? Does not long life bring understanding?" (Job 12:12).

-Senior adults should mentor younger adults. "Remember the days of old; consider the generations long past. Ask your father and he will tell you, your elders, and they will explain to you" (Deut. 32:7).

-God uses people of all ages. "In the last days, God says, I will pour out my spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams" (Acts 2:17).

We must challenge seniors with a kingdom vision of extending the gospel to the unreached neighborhood, community, nation, and world.

# Answering the Call

Woman's Baptist Home and Foreign Missionary Convention of North Carolina. She serves as associate minister at Christian Faith Baptist Church in Raleigh and is the former academic dean and professor of mission and ministry at Shaw University Divinity School. Dr. Bryan is working on a book addressing the subject of call to ministry. She was recently awarded the NAACP Centennial Celebration Award for Outstanding Achievement in Religious Affairs. I recently spoke with her regarding the challenges of her new role. She says people now more than ever are in need of missions—and she's excited to answer the call.

**How has your tenure in your new role been so far?**

The Woman's Convention is a very active ministry moving about with its various activities all over the state and is therefore quite busy. As with any new role, the work has been challenging as well as stimulating and rewarding. We have just celebrated our 125th Annual

Session in Winston-Salem and I am told by many in attendance, including board members, that it was one of the best annual sessions we have had. That gives

me great hope for future projects. I am standing on the shoulders of one, Dr. Priscilla Brodie, who has held the reins and led this organization for thirty years. That is a long time. As the board and I work together, my hope is that we can build on the foundation that has been laid so that we can more readily meet the needs of our people in these times in which we are living.

**How do you plan to accomplish that?**

I think we need to ask ourselves the question, "what does it mean to do missions?" We may need to redefine missions and enter dialogue about what it means to the church as an institution and to the church individually. Historically, what is thought to be missions is narrowly defined as visiting the sick and carrying meals to the neighbors by little ladies in white dresses. While those are certainly important mission efforts, I believe the church is challenged to think of missions from a more global perspective, understanding that every Christian

has been called to be a missionary. When we responded to God's call to join the body of Christ, in essence, we responded to an invitation to the mission field. So to deny oneself as being a missionary is to reject the call of God.

**You mentioned "these times in which we are living." Can you elaborate?**

In my opinion, we're living in what the scriptures refer to as 'perilous times.' Socially, economically, educationally, and politically, these are crucial times requiring some crucial and perhaps radical responses from God's people. People are looking for answers and they don't know where to go. I was listening to a radio program not too long ago when I heard the announcer share a call he received from a young woman whose troubles were so extreme that she was losing trust in God. She asked the announcer to pray for her that she not lose hope in God. Her troubles were overwhelming. That was just one person who confessed, but there are many others who are in some very stressful circumstances. Another example is a woman who found her way into our office looking for help because she had

no money to pay her rent. Our call is more than theoretical but requires praxis. The cry right now is for action.

**Describe what you see the Woman's Convention role being?**

The Woman's Convention motto is 'Christ in Every Home.' The convention seeks to provide the means by which this motto can be achieved through training, education, prayer, fellowship, community, and provision. The Woman's Convention supports six objectives: 1) Shaw University, 2) Shaw University Divinity School, 3) foreign missions, 4) state missions, 5) Central Children's Home, and 6) J.J. Johnson Baptist Assembly. However, to describe the role of the Woman's Convention has to be an ongoing discussion as the seasons and cries for our services change.

**Is there anything in particular at the top of your agenda?**

Administratively, a number one priority for me is to work with the board to build community amongst our people. Missionally, a number one priority is refurbishing the J.J. Johnson Baptist Assembly so that our children can return to camp next summer in our own facilities.

Each year, as part of the International Day of Prayer for Peace, more individuals, groups, congregations, and communities throughout the

erally moving in a direction that is more aligned with conservative biblical teachings.

This report is based upon tele-



phone interviews conducted by The Barna Group among nine nationwide random samples of adults. In the course of the 9,232 interviews conducted, each respondent was asked if

they considered themselves to be black or African-American. These surveys were conducted between January 2007 and November 2008. In total, there were 1,272 adults in the African-American category.

The Barna Group, Ltd. 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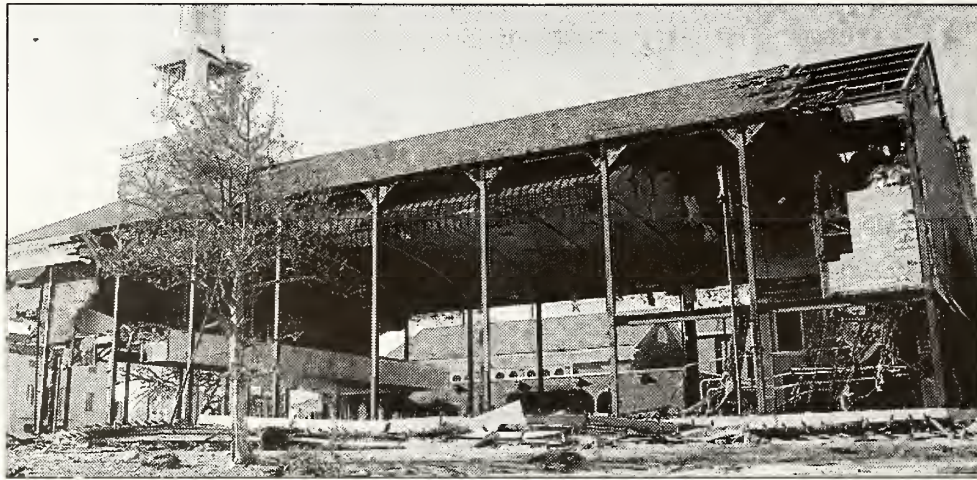

nities to partner with other funding organizations that have produced more impact than we can accurately quantify. A generous \$1 million gift from Fountain Baptist Church in Summit, New Jersey, enabled us to build on the previous work by nurturing families, churches, and communities.

We have, and continue to, provide scholarships to adults for skills training and college degrees. We arranged 10 months of coaching for pastors in the region and gave nearly \$400,000 in ministry grants (one project is the development of a 20-acre site that will serve as a Christian

camp and operational command center for future hurricanes in Louisiana).

Our partners have launched more than 200 housing units and secured nearly 100 acres for new housing development. I was on the phone this week moving toward closure for a new skills training program that

will equip unemployed and discouraged workers for high-paying construction jobs in the region. We're also working on raising funds to scholarship people to become certified nursing assistants. There are many job opportunities in this health care profession in the region.

Some plant. Some water. God gives the increase.

Most people turned away from the Gulf Coast within weeks or months after the hurricane. Lott Carey has stayed the course. We continue to invest and collaborate to find new resources in “helping people rise again.” You can see newsletter updates at our website to rejoice in your work and to pray for more impact. 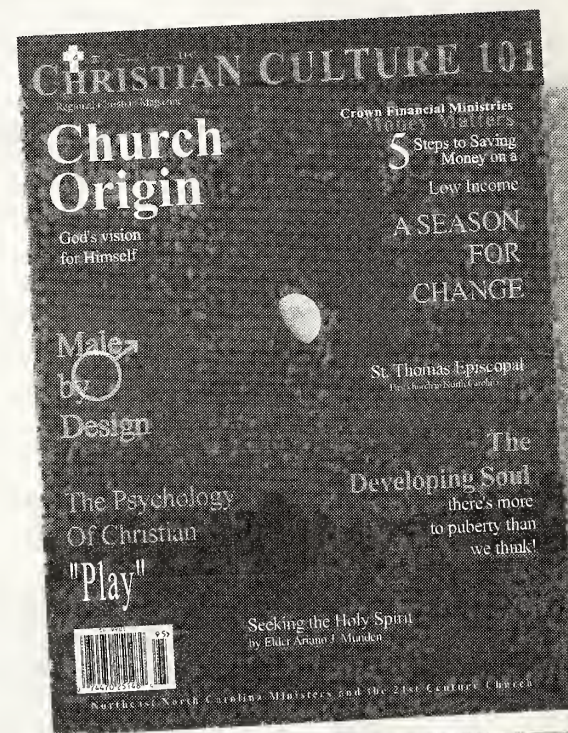

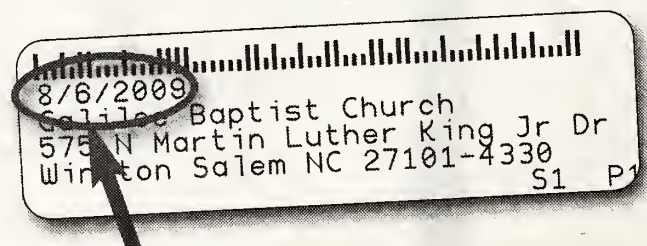
