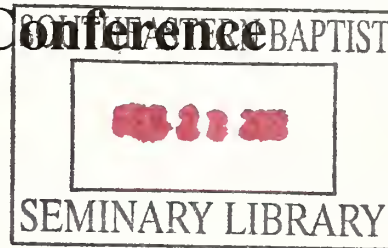

Music Consortium Added to Shaw Minister's Conference

Musicians, Vocalists & Clinicians will Explore "Brokenness of Church Music"

In churches across the nation, there are vexing questions about the musical tone of Sunday morning. Should traditional sounds such as "Down at the Cross" fill the sanctuary or should it be contemporary, hip-hop chords such as "Stomp?" Are many of the thumping beats just too "night club friendly"?

Exploring such issues and redefining the bonds between pastors, musicians, ministers and the congregations they

serve is the focus of a new Music Consortium that will be held next month during the 38th Annual Alexander/Pegues Minister's Conference at Shaw University, Raleigh.

During the four day conference, discussion, debates and dialogues will address such diverse issues as the dynamics of pastor-musician relationships, the direction of church music, finding and paying a musician, fixing "broken music" and re-examining the role of hymns, spiritual songs and anthems in today's churches.

Attendees will also develop a choir that will perform during the Minister's Conference, planned for March 21-24 at Shaw University's Divinity School. Clinicians will include Tiffany B. Cornelous of Raleigh, Dr. Leonita Thompson

Cornwall of Shaw University, Raleigh, the Rev. Quientrell L. Burrell of Weldon and others.

In many churches, the music is careering into a direction contrary to "what the Bible has lifted it up to be," according to the Reverend C.J. LeMay, pastor of Sandy Fork Missionary Baptist Church in Nash County, and longtime director of music for the Minister's Conference.

In an effort to attract younger people to congregations, many churches have replaced traditional hymns with praise songs, including some that lack the spiritual depth of the songs of yesteryear, he said. This can leave a teaching void, he said, and goes against what the Apostle Paul spoke about in the Book of Ephesians (5:18-19), explaining that Christians should be "singing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs."

"Much of today's songs are simply praise," Rev. LeMay said during a recent

38th Annual Minister's Conference Planned for March

The 38th Annual Alexander/Pegues Minister's Conference will be held March 21-24 at Shaw University in Raleigh.

The conference, presented by the Shaw University Divinity School, will feature notable theologians, preachers and clinicians, including the Rev. Dr. John W. Kinney, School of Theology, Virginia Union University in Richmond, Va.

This year's program will include a music consortium featuring classes for musicians, vocalists and others associated with church music. interview. "You go to many churches and there are no hymn books. We're not bashing praise music, but it seems that some people are bringing in the music of the clubs, rather than looking at the purpose of music in

the church biblically. Our music is one of the greatest teaching tools we can have in the church. Hymnity teaches the theology of the church. Many have changed the tunes, upped the tempo, yet they still use the same words to teach the message. The message of the cross does not change."

The messages behind the music is what helped organizers to adopt the Consortium's theme - "Examining the Brokenness of Church Music: A Return to the Glory of the Cross & the Power of Resurrection." It is designed to foster spirited discussions on even once-taboo subjects such as the often-tenuous relationship between pastors and musicians.

The Rev. LaMont Johnson, the pastor of Providence Baptist Church in Rockingham, will teach a class that focuses on pastors and their minister's of music. Too often, he's heard pastors bemoan the fact that their musicians are "not qualified" or are out of sync with their goals, he said. For this reason, they'll look at major topics: Hiring practices, writing job descriptions, equipping younger people and developing compensation packages.

"We're really trying to cover a broad spectrum of music concerns in the church, especially the effect that a nega-

tive relationship between pastor and musician can have on a ministry," said Johnson, a New Jersey native who comes from a family of pastors and musicians. "The pastor should be at the helm. The pastor is the true worship leader of their church. They set the tone and the vision with the aid of the Holy Spirit."

However, he added that often a pastor's expectations and demands on a musician or minister of music can sometimes be unrealistic or impractical.

"You can't expect someone with a Ph.D in musicology to create music and composition, play anthems and teach and you're only paying them \$50 a Sunday. It's all relative to the area and the church's budget, but a lot of churches need to re-gauge how they're looking at compensation packages for the entire staff."

Minister Jamaine D. Smith, also a conference clinician, agreed that exploring the pastor-musician dynamic will help congregations. His class will examine the role of musicians in worship. For example, musicians who leave the service while the pastor is preaching often miss opportunities to embellish or deepen the worship experience, losing out on cues to add music.

"A lot of younger musicians don't understand how to undergird or serve the pastor during the preached moment," said Smith, who has been minister of music at First Baptist Church of Kannapolis for two years. "Some pastors like musical support during the entire preaching moment. Some like it just at the end. It's important for the musician to make that connection. We'll give tips to pastors who might be struggling in this area. They should not have to tell the musician when to come in. They [the musician] should be in tune with the preaching. When the right chemistry is there, it can take the preached word to a new dimension."

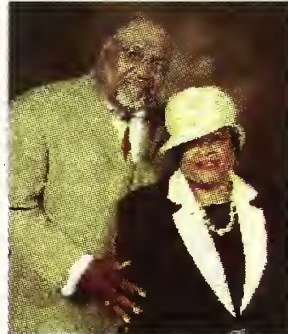

With the increasing growth of the Winston-Salem location, Dr. Robert L. McGowens and the Greater Galilee Baptist Church Winston-Salem congregation have entered into a partnership with the Southside Baptist Church congregation at 401 E. Sprague St. This partnership includes joint use of the Southside Baptist Church facility. Future plans are to have joint worship services, joint Vacation Bible School, as well as joint Outreach and Evangelism.

Greater Galilee (Winston-Salem Location) will begin holding services at Southside Baptist Church beginning in February 2011. Services will continue to be held on Saturdays with Church School beginning at 10:00 a.m.; and Morning Worship at 10:45 a.m.

Dr. McGowens is no stranger to the Winston-Salem and Triad area. He served as Pastor for 11½ years at the Galilee Missionary Baptist Church, prior to being called to Charlotte to lead the congregation of the Greater Galilee Baptist Church at 501 West Park Avenue. His presence was surely felt as his heart was to serve the congregation and the community. His passion for outreach created ministries such as Clothing and Feeding Ministries, Free Health Clinics for the less fortunate, and partnered with Kennedy Middle School to assist at risk students, and developed a scholarship for Carver High School Students and many other facets. Upon his departure as Pastor of Galilee Missionary Baptist Church, his passion to serve others was carried to Charlotte, where similar ministries were developed and adopted into practice by the Charlotte congregation.

The birth of Greater Galilee Winston-Salem grew out of McGowens passion and love for his commuting members. Many members were commuting two to three days a week from Winston-Salem and High Point to Charlotte every week. The Winston-Salem location allows members to maintain connection with the mother church in Charlotte and also reduce their travel distance. With the new facility, Greater Galilee now has the ability to serve God's people not only through Saturday worship, but through weekly Bible Institute and Outreach. The newly developed relationship with Southside Baptist church will be an opportunity to reach the masses and carry out God's plan. Both congregations are eagerly ready to assist each other in developing projects with their congregations and community.

This union comes together a year after McGowens' return to the Winston-Salem area. We continue to wish the best for Pastor McGowens in his endeavors in growing his ministry and his commitment to Empowering People To Be God's People. For African-American History Month, a Focus on Hungry People

This African-American History Month, Bread for the World encourages us to use this time of celebration of our heritage to consider what we can do to help hungry and poor people.

African-Americans all over the country continue to suffer the effects of the economic recession. We have our hands full with the problems in our own neighborhoods and extended families. But both as Christians and as African-Americans, we also need to focus on the needs of hungry people everywhere – particularly in Africa and the Caribbean since many of us trace our roots to these regions. God's grace in Jesus Christ moves us to help our neighbors, whether they live in the next house, the next state, or the next continent.

High rates of unemployment have led to dramatic increases in poverty and food insecurity in the African-American community over the past

few years. Data released in November 2010 by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) show that in 2009, 25 percent of black households struggled to put food on the table, compared with 11 percent of white households. Even worse, almost 35 percent of black children lived in households at risk of hunger – more than twice the percentage of white children.

These figures are alarming—so what can we do? Helping struggling friends and relatives and making charitable donations are important, but we cannot “food bank” our way out of hunger. We must remind our elected leaders not to forget people in need because, with the stroke of a pen, policies can be made that redirect millions of dollars and affect millions of lives. Congress must protect and strengthen safety-net programs like school lunch, school breakfast, WIC, and SNAP (formerly called food stamps), as well as policies such as the Earned Income Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit, which put money back in the pockets of low-wage workers.

But these problems are not exclusive to this country. There are almost 1 billion chronically hungry people around the world. U.S. foreign assistance can do a great deal to give hungry people the tools and opportunity they need to improve the lives of their families. Bread for the World's 2011 Offering of Letters campaign

urges Congress and the administration to make our foreign assistance even more effective in reducing global poverty. We invite churches and community organizations to advocate for particular improvements with their individual members of Congress.

The start of the 112th Congress offers a fresh opportunity to pursue a bipartisan effort to end hunger at home and abroad. But it will take advocacy to make this happen. 
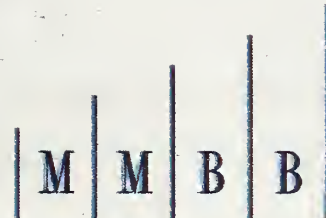
