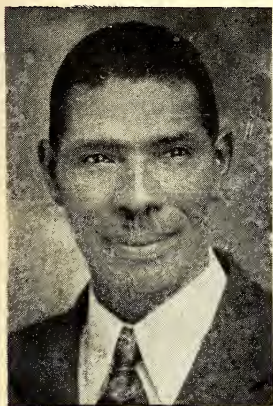

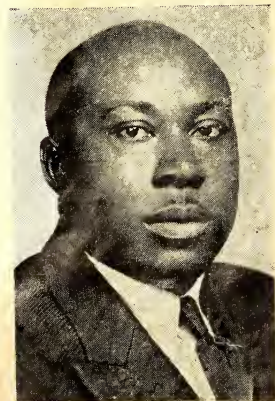

Editorial Comments

August and Two State Meetings

During the month of August, three state "auxiliary" Conventions will hold their first real post-war annual meetings. August 6-8, the State Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Conventions will convene at the Sycamore Hill Baptist Church in Greenville, and on August 21-23, the Woman's Home and Foreign Mission Convention will meet at Shaw University.

All of the groups have well planned educational and inspirational programs and are preparing for large delegations from their respective memberships.

Highlighting, perhaps, the Convention in Greenville will be an address by the Rev. E. C. Smith of Washington, D. C., president of the Virginia Baptist State Convention and outstanding preacher and teacher. Among the great features of the Woman's session will be addresses by Mrs. Cora Pair Thomas and Miss Minnie C. Lyon, who have just returned to America after 38 and 26 years respectively as missionaries in Liberia, Africa.

"World Brotherhood Through Christian Stewardship" will be the theme of the Sunday School and B.T.U. Convention; and "United We Grow," the theme of the Woman's Convention.

Can It Have Power?

One of the tragic weaknesses of the Christian Church is its failure to courageously fight immortality in "total." For example, the white Methodist and Baptist churches in the South (along with others) are crying out forcefully against the legalized selling of "distilled spirits" and are appropriating goodly sums of money to keep the fight in the front. This, they ought to do, but why not a fight against segregation, a practice that is "eating the heart" out of Christianity? Is not segregation immoral though upheld by state governments in the South as is legalized drinking? How can one be effectively fought while the other stands unmentioned?

Can the church convinced God-face-seekers that it is "all out" for a moral universe when it fails

to courageously fight segregation—"hook, line and sinker?" Can it lead the secular world to abolish drinking or any other evil? Can it have real power with such a stand?

Dean of Radio Preachers Retires

Recently, the Rev. Harry Emerson Fosdick, pastor of the great Riverside Church in New York, retired after a career of 43 years in the ministry.

Viewing his career as a minister, he takes great satisfaction in the help he has given individuals.

"I've had thousands of personal interviews. My whole idea of the ministry is service to personality—individual personality—and that has its widest opportunity in the personal interview."

His idea led him to a theory, he relates, which he taught as professor of practical theology at Union Seminary—that a sermon should not be a monologue but a "personal interview on a group scale."

His biggest disappointment, he claims, is that "I've been in the ministry 43 years and the world is a mess."

"War always lets loose hate, and when the war is over and the enemy is not there any more, you turn to hating someone else. After every world war you have heightening of hatred against classes and minorities and majorities. That, I think will die out."

Fosdick believes that "foxhole religion" is an insubstantial religion and maintains that religion in its best aspect was not strengthened by the war.

"War for most people is not a character builder," he declares, "it's a character destroyer."

But he feels that some good may come from the thought provoked by the war; that people reflecting on war's causes and effects are "beginning to see a definite need for a spiritual revival."

At the age of 68, the former pastor of the \$6,000,000 church built under his administration, plans to spend a goodly portion of his time writing books. He has written several of the best sellers in America, and it may well be predicted that "the best is yet to come."

Baptists, State and National

Moyock is in the northern section of Currituck which borders Virginia and the Atlantic Ocean borders this Northeastern Carolina County to the East. It is longitudinal in shape and tapers southward into the Currituck and Albemarle Sounds. There is fishing in the water which surrounds it and truck farming of potatoes both kinds, watermelons and cantaloupes. The hunting consists of ducks, geese and deer. It is a strong Baptist county. Recently William H. Case, wealthy landowner, died and the funeral exercises were held at Corinth Baptist Church, Jarvisburg, Rev. B. C. Ellis pastor. But Moyock is the little village where Christian Home Baptist Church of which P. G. Welch is pastor. This is a high spirited church in membership. The same may be said of the Corinth Church. They have clean surroundings and beautiful buildings and active congregations.

Hobbsville, N. C. in Gates County is the Post Office for the Joppa Baptist Church which entertained Roanoke Baptist Association May 21-23. There were two phases hitherto untried at this session. These were a "Youth Hour" and a "Deacon's Hour," Wednesday and Thursday respectively. **Moderator J. E. Tillet**, a talented progressive and mentally able young man, decided upon these innovations in constructing his program and turned the Association over to Prof. K. A. Williams and the Youth of the Association Wednesday afternoon. They provided an enriching program. Thursday morning and afternoon, again the gavel was surrendered to Prof. C. F. Graves and the Deacons of the Association. An outstanding address was made by M. W. D. Griffin of Mt. Carmel Baptist Church.

The Moderator read a rich and highly literary and meaty address and finally recommended a total Religious Educational program for the Association. A. W. Lamb opposed the recommendation of Moderator Tillet. The Committee of which he was a member, brought in an unfavorable report. The sermons preached by Revs. C. L. Griffin, W. H. Davis, R. R. Cartwright, W. H. Stallings, A. Hughes of New York were representative of the creative ability of these able men. The special ten minute addresses extracted from the General Theme of the Association were enjoyable and thought provoking. Speakers H. L. Mitchel, J. R. McRay, C. M. Morgan, T. S. Cooper, Dr. A. C. Jacob and O. L. Holly. It seems as if every phase of church activity and its interlocking relations was considered in the comprehensive program. The Rev. Thomas Kilgore, Executive Secretary, ably represented the General Baptist Convention in a very versatile address. Visitors to the meeting were C. H. D. Griffin, Farmville, Va.;

C. E. Griffin, son of C. H. D. Griffin, Norfolk, Va.; Lonnie J. Thompson, Hempstead, N. Y.; C. R. Mercer, Jamaica, N. Y.; G. W. Watkins, Oxford, N. C.; and T. A. Hamme, Oxford Orphanage. There were many others. A resolution to consider the advisability of operating a Hospital or an Orphanage or a Home for the Aged and Infirm and to complete the brick building now used for instructional purposes was left in the hands of the moderator to appoint a Committee to activate the plans and projects. \$6,000 was realized during the Associational year and the organization adjourned to meet in Belhaven, N. C., Tuesday before the 4th Sunday in May, 1947. The entertainment was very good and the Joppa Membership deserves thanks.

St. Louis, Missouri. Thomas E. Huntly formerly a Monroe, N. C. boy, now pastoring Central Baptist Church which has a \$100,000 plant, writes that he has added a Religious Education Director, a Social Service Worker and Fine Arts Department Worker (full time employment). He is highly respected in the city of St. Louis and in the State of Missouri from our observation and is pointing the leadership wisely. He is a credit to North Carolina.

Merry Hill, N. C. is a midway bus station for Ahoskie, Windsor, Edenton and the large counties Bertie, Northampton, Hertford in Northeastern Carolina. It was our pleasure to visit Peterson Chapel recently, Rev. W. H. Trotman pastor. It is a large building attractively set in a wooded grove with a large membership. It is the home church of Rev. J. P. and J. W. Law, prominent ministers of Northeastern Carolina.

A few miles north of **Edenton** Welch's Chapel is situated, Rev. W. H. Davis, who preaches here twice each month. His method of training the membership of the church has value. Especially is this true financially. All bills are paid during the week. None are paid on Sunday although considerable finance is received on Sunday. This is a very progressive membership. They plan to enlarge their concept of stewardship for church work by donating in a larger way to missionary, educational, benevolent and charitable agencies. The membership seemed happy as they gave a voluntary purse to Rev. Davis, that he might visit the Congress at Chicago in June.

Winfall, N. C. is a small village in Perquimans County where George Durant, an Englishman, made the first contract for land with the Indians, given in the United States. Here is located Ellis Temple Baptist Church, founded by Benjamin Ellis, a layman, 34 years ago. Rev. J. C. Davis celebrated his ninth anniversary with encouraging results. These are men and churches that supply the skeletal strength of North Carolina Baptists.

Mrs. Malinda L. Staton Speaks to the Women of Bladen County Union

Dear Sisters and Friends:

It does not seem possible that one year has passed since we had our Annual Meeting, but our gathering today tells us that it has and that each day has taken into eternity its number. This year our theme has been: "A Charge to Keep I Have a God to Glorify." As we think of this each day it has made us to become better Christians; and as we sit in this meeting I am asking that each one of us think of it more seriously. And when we leave to return to our homes, let us keep it in remembrance and ask God in our prayers to give us strength to go forward.

My subject today is: "The How of Community Missions." Where there are circles, each one has a community mission Chairman, and these, with the general chairman, form the Community Missions Committee of the Society. Before effective community missions can be done, community needs must be faced and must be found. Mission Sunday Schools or Bible classes or Christian Americanization classes or **home-maker's clubs** are needed in every community. There are lonely people to be visited, the sick and aged to be ministered to, **children to be taught in Christian ideals**, homes where cottage prayer meetings can be held and lost people to be won to Christ. These needs, whatever they are, should be found. Every month, every individual in every circle and in every society should have something definite to do in community missions. Visitation lies at the foundation of Community missions. It doesn't take any special ability or money but only **willingness and Christian tact** and friendliness to do effective visiting. The visitor can carry comfort to the sad, help to the poor, friendliness to the lonely, strength to the weak, hope to the hopeless, love to the loveless and, best of all, the message of salvation to the lost.

Another method of community missions is the distributing of material gifts to meet human needs. **Our love can express itself** in a basket of food, a load of wood, a pair of shoes, trays for the sick, flowers for the lonely, **Bibles, Testaments and leaflets** bearing the Christian message for those who **need spiritual guidance**. It isn't enough that a circle prepare a basket and send to a needy family, but someone of the members should carry it, making a personal contact with the family. "Not what we give but what we share, for the gift without the giver is bare." So we see that every method and every form of community missions rightly used and motivated, becomes a

means of winning souls. The trouble is that all too often we lose sight of this fundamental aim of community missions. We carry our flowers to the sick but do not linger to pray. We carry the basket of food to a home but fail to give them the bread of life. We send our old clothes to a poor family but fail to follow them with our interest in the spiritual welfare of those who wear them. We make our hospital visits because someone is there that we know but fail to minister to the spiritual needs of the patients. Most people feel as did Edgar Guest when he wrote:

I'd rather see a sermon than to hear one any day;
I'd rather one would walk with me
Than merely show the way.

The best of all the preachers are the men who live their creeds,

For to see good put in action is what everybody needs.

He preached to capacity audiences and sixteen (16) persons were saved or added to the church. After this successful meeting, and in conformance with its previous plans the General Baptist State Convention sent the **Reverend Joseph Haggler** to **Maffitt Village** to do general religious work, and to "pastor" the village. Spreading the Kingdom Through Evangelism

(A summary of a lecture delivered by the Rev. G. Allen Boyd of Wilmington, N. C. during the Setting of the South Eastern Convention, held with the First Baptist Church, Teachey, N. C., May 16 and printed by request.)

Evangelism is nothing new. It is as old as God. It was the work of the prophets, the work of Jesus, the work of the apostles, and is the work of the present day minister, along with any one who is moved by the spirit of God.

Evangelism is preaching and spreading the gospel of Christ. Again it is the doctrine and preaching of evangelical principles. Any one who is born of God, backed up by Christ, having the word of God as a burning fire, stirred by the Holy Spirit to weariness to go into the hedges and high ways and there talk to men about Christ, until with tear-stained eyes they cry, with perpetual repentance and unshaken faith, he is a real evangelist. Whosoever does such work, is spreading The Kingdom Through Evangelism.

The gospel of Christ, charged with power from on high, "deep seated" in a consecrated heart plucks up, breaks down, destroy, and overthrows sin. The gospel of Christ builds and plants the seed of right and righteousness in the heart of men.

President Truman says, "It is up to education to bring about that deeper international understanding which is so vital to world peace." The life of Christ applied to the heart of men, through the preaching of the gospel, through the doctrine and preaching of evangelical principles, plus religious education, will bring about that deeper international understanding which is vitally needed for world

peace. It is through the preaching of the gospel, that this world is to be saved, and not through education alone. Education with no God in it has nothing in it to bring peace to a sinful world.

The Samaritan Woman in tact with Jesus (heaven's F.B.I. and psychologist) turned the pages of her life's history bringing to view that which she had hoped to keep forever hidden. She forgot the Savior thrist, which she had purposed to supply. With heart overflowing with gladness, she hastened on her way, to impart to others the precious light

she had received. "Come see a man, which told me all things that I ever did." This woman, unconsciously, just a baby in Christianity, publicized the kingdom of God and our Christ throughout the city, by telling the truth, and when we hasten on to tell others about the love of God, to the extent that they come to taste of the same thing, the Kingdom of God is being spreaded through evangelism.
