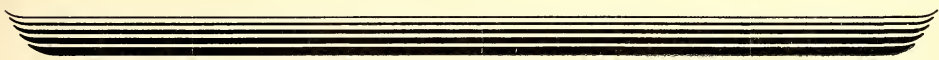

Editorial Comments

Orphanage Month

During the next few years, Negro citizens, particularly in North Carolina, will be called upon to contribute \$300,000.00 in order that orphans in our state might be more adequately cared for.

Like all other educational and human institutions, the Orphanage in Oxford is aware of the serious need for better and more expanded services, and is launching a campaign for funds to meet these needs.

In its 64 year history, the institution has done an excellent job in training the minds and hands of motherless and fatherless children and in cultivating their souls. Thousands of potential juvenile delinquents have been trained to be useful citizens as a result of the character-building program of the orphanage.

Endeavoring to give systematic support to the work of the orphanage, the General Baptist Convention has pledged to give through its cooperative program \$5,000.00 during the current fiscal year. The month of *September* is Orphanage Month in the Convention's emphasis, and President Bishop and Executive Secretary Kilgore are calling upon every *Missionary* Baptist Church in North Carolina to give its membership an opportunity to make an offering for the Orphanage on the third Sunday. In cases where services are not held on the third Sunday, pastors are requested to arrange an offering on one of the other four Sundays.

North Carolina Baptists outnumber any other denominational group in North Carolina almost two to one, and it is hoped that in support of all good causes our support will be twice that of the other groups.

49th Annual Meeting of Lott Carey

Having had the most successful and perhaps the most fruitful year in its forty-nine year history, the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention, U. S. A., will hold its 1946 session, August 27-30, in the Enon Temple Baptist Church, Germantown, Philadelphia, Penn.

An unusual feature of the session will be the presentation of four foreign workers of the Convention, who have all spent over a quarter century in foreign service. Representing the work in Saint Marc, Haiti, will be Dr. and Mrs. Boaz A. Harris, who have directed the mission stations there for over 30 years. Mrs. Cora Pair Thomas retiring as acting superintendent, and Miss Minnie C. Lyon, teacher, of the stations in Liberia, Africa, for 38 and 26 years respectively, will represent mission workers in Africa. The appearance of these foreign servants is expected to draw a host of messengers, and will certainly add new lustre to this historic gathering.

Also of great importance and concern, will be a report on an inspection tour of the fields in Africa by Executive Secretary Wendell C. Somerville.

The theme of the meeting will be "The Contribution of the American Negro in Building a Better World Through Christian Missions."

Commenting on the remarkable progress the organization has made since its founding, President G. O. Bullock issued the following statement:

"Our success thus far as an organization is not because we have supported missionaries in foreign fields, or built churches and schools, but rather because we have realized our fundamental responsibility for our brother throughout the world. We cannot lose the vision now, we must press forward, prepared to meet our new and increasing responsibilities."

The Task of The Church

Out matching the Nazi in cruelty, a group of white men of Monroe, Ga. ran "amuck" July 25 shooting in cold blood four Georgia Negroes, three of them unquestionably innocent, including two women.

The mob of violent Georgians have not been found, but thorough investigation and search is being made as ordered by Governor Ellis Arnall. Rewards totaling \$30,000.00 have been offered including \$10,000.00 from Arnall, and it is expected that rewards will be increased to \$100,000, if necessary, to locate the lynchers.

Though decent loving people all over America are disturbed over the deplorable incident and are anxious that every person participating will be brought to justice, our greatest concern must be in breaking down those customs and mores which lead to this type of inhuman act.

As we learned from a war which cost billions of dollars and many of our most promising youth, people are not changed by "thrushing" and other pressure methods. The human spirit cannot be crushed. It must be changed.

It is at this point, where the Christian Church rightfully enters (or should enter).

Having manifested a "secondary" influence in transforming humanity, the churches of Christ must awaken to their stewardship in changing the forces which are destroying righteousness and justice that they may be used in establishing these values.

The great task of the church today is to use its numerous resources—prophetic preaching, creative worship and creative Christian Education, in transforming the evil spirit of individual people to a spirit of righteousness and justice to all people. Until this task is fulfilled, we may expect crimes and wars, and even the destruction of humanity itself.

Some of God's Mysteries

An unbeliever once said, "I will believe only what I can understand; none of that 'mystery stuff' for me."

He was asked to explain this problem: How is it possible for a black cow to eat green grass which makes white milk and churns yellow butter?

Can you explain this mystery of God? Note some other mysteries of His creation.

Consider the remarkable transformation that takes place when a caterpillar (an upholstered worm) encases itself in its home-made casket and is changed into a beautiful butterfly. Its hair is

changed to scales—a million to the square inch; the many legs of the caterpillar become the six legs of the butterfly; the yellow becomes a beautiful red; the crawling instinct becomes a flying instinct.

Thus will God take the life of a sinner and transform it until it glows with the beauty of the Lord and is fragrant with the graces of heaven.

A handful of sand is deposited by the Lord in the heart of the earth. Great heat is applied from beneath and ponderous weight from above until, when it is found by man, it has been miraculously changed into a beautiful, fiery opal.

God takes a handful of clay, deposits it deep in the earth, applies great heat beneath it, and when it is found by man it has become a beautiful amethyst, prized highly.

God takes a handful of black carbon, plants it deep in the bowels of the earth, treats it with heat below, presses it with rocks of the mountains above, and transforms it into a glorious diamond fit for a king's crown.

As God performs these wonderful miracles in nature. He also can transform the souls of men and renew their hearts if they only trust fully in Christ Jesus, the Lord of life.

Note the marvelous accuracy of God in His operations in the three kingdoms of the earth—the animal, the vegetable and the mineral kingdoms. This is apparent in the hatching of eggs, for example:

The eggs of the potato bug hatch in 7 days; those of the canary in 14 days; those of the barnyard hen in 21 days; those of ducks and geese in 28 days; those of the mallard in 35 days; those of the parrot and the ostrich in 42 days.

God knows how to regulate nature. Only the One who made you can successfully direct you. Only the One who made your brain and your heart can successfully guide them to a profitable end.

God's wisdom is seen in the structure of the elephant. The four legs of this great beast bend forward in the same direction. No other quadruped is so made. God planned that this animal should have a huge body, too large to live on two legs. For this reason He gave it four fulcrums so that it could rise from the ground easily.

The horse rises from the ground on its two front legs first.

The cow rises from the ground with its two hind legs first. How wise the Lord is in all His works of creation!

God's wisdom is revealed in His arrangements of sections and segments as well as in the number of grains.

Each watermelon has an even number of stripes on the rind.

Each orange has an even number of segments.

Each ear of corn has an even number of rows.

Each stalk of wheat has an even number of grains.

The waves of the sea roll in on the shore twenty-six to the minute in all kinds of weather.

All grains are found in even numbers on the stalks, and the Lord specified thirtyfold, sixtyfold and an hundredfold—all even numbers.

God has caused all flowers to blossom at certain specified times during the day, so that Linneus, the great botanist, once said that if he had a conservatory containing the right kind of soil, moisture and temperature he could tell the time of the day or night by the flowers that were open and those that were closed.

Thus the Lord, in His wonderful grace, can arrange the life that is entrusted to His care in such a way that it will carry out His purposes and plans. Only the life given over to the care of the Lord is safe.

Another mystery as yet unsolved by man is this: God causes the limb of a tree to grow straight out from the trunk for a distance of forty, fifty or sixty feet, with no other anchorage than fifteen or eighteen inches of fibers which lose themselves in the trunk of the tree. No human being has discovered how to apply this principle in the construction of buildings or bridges.

God takes oxygen and hydrogen, both of them odorless, tasteless and colorless, and combines them with carbon which is insoluble, black and tasteless. The result of this combination is beautiful, white, sweet sugar. How does God do it? I do not understand.

I know only that God can take your life—drab, useless and fruitless—and transform it into a beautiful garden of the sweetest graces for His glory. He will do this for you, if you will trust your life to Him!

Baptists, State and National

From reports on the number of Christian educational institutes and conferences held in our state, **North Carolina Baptists** are awake and at work in the way of training and teaching. This is as it should be. A great change is taking place in the field of religious education, and it is well that we are aware of it. It occurs to me that the fields of religious education and social service, offer definite opportunities of exploitation and promising values to youth who are seeking new frontiers of Christian service.

State Baptists are offering increased services in religious and Christian educational studies thru an enlarged group of workers and instructors.

This program is also shared by the extension division of the department of Religious Promotion of Shaw University. The laity, along with the ministry, is returning to school annually, learning how to render a more efficient service, and becoming touched by persons who have been touched. May this type of emphasis continue, and let us hope that a larger group of workers will join in preparation for more effective services.

Chicago, Ill. Thousands of Baptists from all over the country gathered in the Nation’s second City in June for two National Baptist Sunday School and B.T.U. Training Conferences.

It was my privilege to serve for the 21st year as instructor of Senior Sunday School Teachers for the Congress sponsored by the incorporated organization. The Rev. Leon C. Riddick, director of Christian Education and Training, was among the speakers.

Edenton, N. C. On the fifth Sunday, the Baptists of **Roanoke Association** assembled for their Union meetings. There are three divisions of the union, so divided geographically as to accommodate all of the rural church population. The Northeast Bound, comprising Dare, Pasquotank, Currituck and Camden counties, met at Shiloh. Middle Ground, comprising Chowan, Gates and Perquimans Counties, met at Edenton; and Albemarle, comprising Tyrrell, Washington and Beaufort, the Revs. C. L. Griffin, W. H. Davis and W. O. Rogers respectively.

The founding fathers of the organization had a good plan of establishing, building and strengthening churches. Preachers in this section, through forceful preaching and inspiring gospel singers, have led in constructing several good churches. It seems to me now that a literary program may be offered and instructional services furnished with extension credit. Instruction to church officers and workers might be given.

All church officers and workers of Baptist churches need to study text books to find new and improved methods of leading and serving. He who does not study nor go places, has come to the end of his growth. His leadership is dull, uninspiring and backward. The present day leadership, as previously, calls for a “forward look.”

Elizabeth City. The Corner Stone Baptist Church, the Rev. J. R. R. McRay, pastor, has been listening for the past few Sundays, to its delegates report the content of the courses they pursued at the Chicago Congress. They are heard at the regular 11 o’clock service. The members are allowed to participate in the program and much information and inspiration are being received.

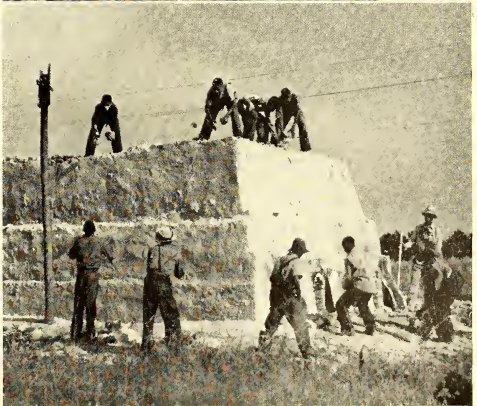
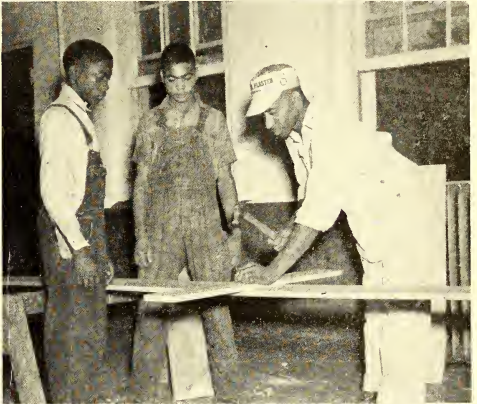

An Open Letter

Dear Co-Worker:

This letter comes to you in the place of your Executive Secretary to tell you of the progress and condition of our State Convention as we round out the tenth month of our 1945-46 fiscal year. September 30th is only two months away, and though we have done a better job in service and in raising funds for Christian Missions, and Christian Education, and Benevolence than ever before, we yet have a long way to go before reaching our goal of \$150,000.00.

As of today (July 31) we have raised for the Unified Program \$50,159.55, for Shaw Expansion \$9,720.13, and for Oxford Orphanage \$1,059.86. According to our budgets for these objectives these next two months challenge us to raise for the Unified Program \$19,830.45, for Shaw Expansion \$65,279.87, and for Oxford Orphanage \$3,940.14. Many of our churches and organizations have sent money directly to the objectives, when the report comes from them to our office the above stated amounts which we yet have to raise will be reduced. But there is still an imperative challenge to every Baptist Church and organization to give more if you have already given, and to give freely in paying quotas and pledges if you have not given. We must not fail in our efforts for Kingdom Building.

May I close this letter by asking that you do two specific things. First, the month of September is being observed as Oxford Orphanage Month, and the Third Sunday in September as Oxford Orphanage Day. Our request is that each church will receive an offering for the Orphanage on that day, and send it to our office. For those churches which do not have services on the Third Sunday we are asking

that the offering for the Orphanage would be taken on any Sunday in September; and, secondly, we are eagerly expecting you and representatives of your church at the Seventy-ninth Annual Meeting of the General Baptist State Convention at Ebenezer Baptist Church, Charlotte, Dr. H. M. Moore, pastor, October 29, 30, and 31.

money that is raised in many local conventions for Missions and Christian Education is never used or sent away for the intended purpose. East Cedar Grove Leader Calls On Messengers to "Go Forward"

Delivering his 11th annual message as moderator during the annual session held July 24-25 in the Rock Spring Baptist Church, Creedmoor, the Rev. G. W. Thomas called upon a host of messengers of the East Cedar Grove Association to "go forward" in a cooperative and consolidated church program and in their financial effort.

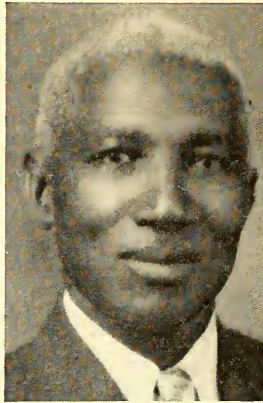
"We must go forward in a cooperative and consolidated church program in communities where there are several small rural churches having service only once per month," he advised. Pointing out the opportunities in consolidation, he asserted, "Three or four churches could combine their forces and build a modern brick church with Sunday School rooms, basement, baptizing pool and a modern heating system."

In calling for a forward march in the financial goal of the organization, the Rev. Mr. Thomas recommended that a goal of \$7,867.00 be set for the year 1946-47.

Speaking of the need for training, the leader told the delegation that there was a great need for better prepared teachers in the churches.

"Sunday School teachers need special training in the Bible in order to teach others. High School and College boys and girls are not going to be contented to hear a person who knows nothing about the subject he tries to teach," he said. "The teacher must not only know his Bible, but must know that he has been changed from death unto life," he continued.

In a statement referring to the new scale of measurement of the church, Mr. Thomas said: "The success of a church or a pastor in the future will not be measured by the amount of

money raised, the number of Sunday School rooms constructed or the members taken into the church, but by the number of lives saved and built, and the number of homes united."
