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## 5-Year Plan For BWA

Wake Forest, N.C. (BP) — The Baptist World Alliance (BWA) Executive Committee outlined a five-year timetable for its new division of evangelism and education, and approved funds for shipment of 3,000 Bibles to the USSR, during a meeting here on the Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary campus.

C. Ronald Goulding, BWA associate secretary in London, said the division of evangelism and education will serve as a center for inspiration, cooperation, and resources for Baptists of 141 countries. Goulding will move to the BWA headquarters in Washington, D.C., in 1976 to direct the division, which will need \$45,000 a year to operate.

The committee approved a transfer of the BWA European office from London to some city in Germany in October 1976 when Gerhard Claas of West Germany replaces Goulding as BWA associate secretary in Europe.

Goulding reported that the Department of Religious Affairs of the USSR has granted permission for importation of 3,000 German-language Bibles in cooperation with the United Bible Societies from Brussels, Belgium, to Estonia, USSR. The BWA Relief Committee voted to give \$3,000 toward the cost of the Bibles.

The committee also voted to fund half the cost, or \$90,000, of replacing a Baptist church building in Bratislava, Czechoslovakia. The committee agreed to apply BWA relief funds to, and appeal for new contributions for, necessary renovation of a Baptist church in Chelm Lubelski, Poland; a roof for a church in Budapest, Hungary; an evangelism bus for the Polish Baptist Union; and Christmas parcels for pastors in countries with poverty level ministerial salaries.

"New persons for a new world through Jesus Christ" is the proposed theme of the first five years of the new evangelism and education division. The 1977-78 emphasis will be "A people renewed through Bible study," and "A people renewed for witness and service" will be the 1978-79 follow-up. The 1979-80

The music was superbly directed by Dr. C.R. Moseley

with participants, Mrs. Georgia Guest and Mrs. Leo Williams adding to the worship atmosphere, singing and playing heavenly melodies. The evening preachers, Reverends V.S. Singletary, S.A. Raper and Raymond Lassiter were eloquent, profound, and inspiring.

## Summit Meeting Smashing Success

Raleigh — Chaired by the eminent Dr. Jerry Drayton the "Summit Meeting" resulted in tremendous discussion and debate but when all the smoke cleared and the voices calmed, twenty-nine of the thirty presidential proposals were adopted for implementation by the executive committee.

The lone proposal not adopted related to setting up criteria for replacement and retirement of Convention employees was referred to the personnel committee, chaired by the elite, Dr. J.C. Harris.

The general board and its proficient chairman, Dr. J. Ray Butler adopted the twenty-nine proposals expeditiously. All

except four of the twenty-nine proposals would fall under home missions, headed by Dr. J.C. Harris.

The organization of a state-wide credit union will be handled by the capable Assistant Executive Secretary, Dr. C.C. Craig, and his Benefits Commission.

The auditing of all Convention financial records by a certified public accountant, the compilation of all auxiliary sessions and Convention sessions into one Minute, and the employment of Prison Chaplain will be implemented and executed by the most efficient Executive Secretary, Dr. O.L. Sherrill. He stated to the executive com-

mittee and general board that he would execute and implement all the proposals to the best of his ability and knowledge. However, "some people will have to be educated to change."

The President and administrative committee will monitor the implementation and execution in accordance with the Convention's policy and structure.

All the institution and auxiliary heads expressed total agreement, support and cooperation to the 1976 goals: "5,000 Souls Saved and 1 Million Dollars Raised". All agreed not to maximize one objective nor minimize the other, but present

Winters who co-sponsored Joint House Resolution 1006 with President Johnson, designating January 15 of each year as Dr. Martin L. King, Jr.'s birthday in North Carolina will be program participants. The state-wide candidates will briefly state their philosophy and platform

emphasis ("Into all the world: a church renewed for mission; people renewed for evangelism") will climax with the 14th Baptist World Congress in July 1980 at Toronto, Canada.

The Wake Forest meeting was the fourth time the BWA Executive Committee (formerly Administrative Subcommittee) has met outside the BWA headquarters city of Washington to introduce the leaders and work of the Alliance to more areas of the country. About 350 North Carolinians attended a BWA rally at the First Baptist Church of Raleigh, hosted by the

General Baptist State Convention and the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Goulding and Claas briefed BWA leaders on European Baptist work. The European Baptist Federation will meet in "socialist" countries for the first time in 1976 when its Executive meets March 24-28 at Moscow, USSR, and when its Council meets September 17-20 at Budapest.

Baptists of Germany, Canada, Australia, and most of the BWA representatives from the USA, experienced their first "Pig Picking" when Southeastern Seminary President W. Randall Lolley hosted an outdoor pork roast at his campus home.

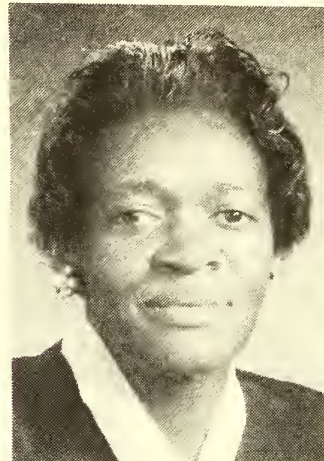

## "From Poverty To Riches"

Lumberton — You have long ago read, heard and seen individuals who have risen from "poverty to riches," but there is a brown-skinned native of Robeson County (with a multi-racial background), who has risen from tenant farmer's last of 13 children to become Tarheelia's second Negro legislator in this century; and the titular head of the 300,000 black Baptist in his native state!

The Rev. Joy Joseph Johnson, Box 455, Fairmont, N.C. 28340, who, because of his outstanding achievements through his early acceptance of Christianity (at the age of 16), and soon becoming a minister, civic leader and attachment to the program of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), found himself being elected the first Negro Councilman of his native Fairmont, where he is now still the pastor of the First Baptist (Negro) Church, despite the fact that he has gone on to halls of the North Carolian General Assembly. These accomplishments have, rightfully, earned for "Jay Jay Jay" the awarding of a Doctorate degree.

Every poverty-stricken youth should read Dr. Johnson's 50 page pocket-size booklet which narrates the struggles, determination, anxiety, ambitions, humility, thanks to God and those of all races-blacks, Indians and whites of this area - who formed the coalition which elected him to Fairmont Town Council and N.C. Legislature.

"Jay Jay Jay" is a far cry from the one we laugh at on the tube. Dr. Johnson is a prime example-even a model - to youths of all races to pattern after, as he has dedicated his life to the service of the church, his family and the nation. He pays tribute to his parents, wife, child and in-laws, along with the ministers, laymen and black and white businessmen who helped him get a home.

At an early age Dr. Mosley joined the Mount Zion Baptist

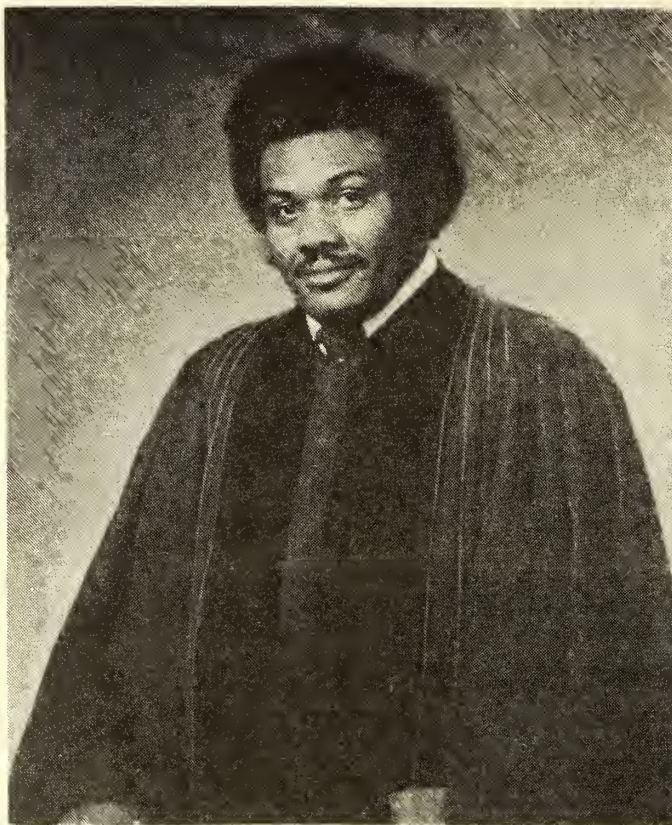
Church, where he responded to the call to the Christian ministry and received license to preach, February, 1957. He was ordained a Baptist minister in May, 1960.

Church Board  
Cuts Personnel

Atlanta — Faced with a projected income insufficient to finance its 1976 programs at the current level, the General Executive Board of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. ordered personnel reductions at home and overseas during its recent three-day meeting.

After seven hours of reviewing budget alternatives, the board voted to reduce its overseas missionary force by 15 from earlier projections for 1976 and gave notice of termination to six domestic staff professionals.

The board voted earlier to scale down the number of missionaries from 397 at the beginning of the year to 355 at the end of 1975.

The 115th General Assembly meeting last June in Charlotte, budgeted for an overseas missionary force at 325 by the end of the 1976. GEB's latest action reduces that number to 310.

The domestic professional staff total at the beginning of the year was 72, and will be 61 with the latest reductions.

Most of the overseas reductions will be achieved through the normal process of attrition.

The six domestic staffers termination date is March 31. However, provision was made for the continuance of salary through June 30 "in case of need."

With the latest reductions, the board is still allocating about two-thirds of its anticipated income to overseas missionary program, personnel and support.

After the board adjourned, the Rev. Dr. G. Thompson Brown, staff director of the Division of International Mission, noted that \$4,519,826 of the board's \$7,053,500 spending budget will go for overseas mission support.

He pointed out that spiraling inflation overseas, as well as at home, was a large factor in the cutback.

"While 10 years ago it cost less to adequately support a missionary family anywhere overseas than in the United States, today the cost of maintaining a missionary overseas is 5 per cent to 60 per cent more than equivalent costs in the USA," Brown said.

## Baptist Call 1975 'Banner Year'

Nashville — Southern Baptist Convention churches experienced another banner year in 1975, according to statistical projections indicating near \$1.5 billion in total receipts, more than 79,000 additional members in Sunday School, and the third highest number of baptisms in SBC history.

The preliminary estimates, compiled through reports received from 26,066 out of more than 34,700 Southern Baptist churches, indicate increased in total receipts, Sunday School enrollment, baptisms, church membership, mission expenditures, church music enrollment. Woman's Missionary Union enrollment and Brotherhood enrollment.

The only predicted decrease is in Training Union enrollment. However, the decrease is not as great as it has been the past few years and may indicate a turn-around in enrollment for the organization. Sunday School Board officials said.

The figures, compiled by the SBC Sunday School Board's research services department, should be close to the final official reports to be released in February 1976, according to Martin B. Bradley, department manager.

At the time the projections were computed, about 8,700 churches had not reported, Bradley said.

Projected baptisms show an increase of two per cent for a total of 418,692, the third highest number in SBC history. This marks the fifth consecutive year in which baptisms have exceeded 40,000. The convention has exceeded that mark only nine times in its 130 year history: three times in the 1950's, once in the 1960's and seven times in the past five years.

It's projected that church membership has continued to increase to a total of 12,716,095 members — a 1.6 per cent increase, reflecting a gain of 200,253.

Total financial receipts continued to increase in 1975, according to church reports. Projections indicate a 10 per cent gain, resulting in a total

of 1,477,296,756. This would be an increase of more than \$134 million over last year's figure.

Mission expenditures are expected to increase nine per cent, gaining nearly \$20 million for a total of \$239,134,043.

Sunday School enrollment is expected to add 79,099 members in 1975 for a total of 7,269,928. This projected figure includes the highest number of "new" Sunday School members since 1961. In 1972, Sunday School experienced its first gain in seven years and has continued to increase since that time.

According to projections, church music enrollment climbed by 45,642 members in 1975 for a 3.5 per cent increase and total of 1,249,710. This marks the 10th straight year that church music enrollment has shown a gain. Church music has gained over 477,000 members in that 10-year period for a yearly average of 47,700.

As reported by SBC churches, Training Union enrollment appears to be slowing its decreasing enrollment trend. The 1975 ongoing enrollment projections, - which do not include new member, leader training, or short term member training registration, showed a 1.4 per cent decrease compared to 2.3 per cent decrease last year and a 4.6 per cent loss in enrollment in Training Union is 1,878,316.

## Sears Grants Shaw \$90,000

Raleigh — Grants totaling \$90,000 from The Sears - Roebuck Foundation will be distributed to 40 colleges and universities including Shaw University in Raleigh and five other institutions in the state.

The total grant was presented in Atlanta by the Foundation on November 12 to The United Negro College Fund. Accepting the check for redistribution to member institutions was Christopher F. Edley of New York, executive director of UNCF. Colleges in North Carolina will receive \$12,634.

The Sears - Roebuck Foundation is a non-profit corporation organized and endowed by Sears, Roebuck and Company to carry on charitable, scientific and educational programs with established groups with a view toward improving the well being of American society.

In 1975 unrestricted grants totaling \$1,250,000 will be made to other private colleges and universities throughout the nation.

At the presentation in Atlanta was A.M. Prado, Sears Southern Territory vice president.

Shaw University in Raleigh will receive \$2,828 from the UNCF grant. Other grants include: Barber - Scotia College in Concord, \$1,498; Bennett College in Greensboro, \$1,572; Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, \$2,196; St. Augustine's College in Raleigh, \$2,805 and Livingston College in Salisbury, \$1,735.

The United Negro College Fund conducts national fund raising campaigns in order to raise money for operating expenses of 41 predominantly black colleges and universities.

Edley said that 48,000 students were enrolled in UNCF institutions last year and the national fund - raising goal for 1975 is \$14 million. The money is used, he said, "for student financial aid, the upgrading of facilities and staff, the upgrading of libraries, to expand curricular offerings in the field of business, economics, medicine and communications and add new teaching and laboratory equipment."

The Sears - Roebuck Foundation has been making grants to UNCF since 1955.

## On The International Scene

Washington, D.C. (BP) — Baptists in Central American and the Caribbean Islands continue to number about 200,000, statistics released by the Baptist World Alliance (BWA) here show.

There are 1,572 Baptist churches in 19 nations and 12 dependencies in the combined areas.

This year's figure is given at 199,042 while last year's report showed 202,414. The main dif-

ference is in Trinidad and Tobago, where it appears a BWA release notes, that a Baptist community of 7,000 was reported in 1974, instead of the baptized believers (generally around 2,250) as reported, correctly, in 1975.

For the 26 jurisdictions included in the report, Baptists increased in 14, declined in 3 and remain unchanged in numbers in 9.

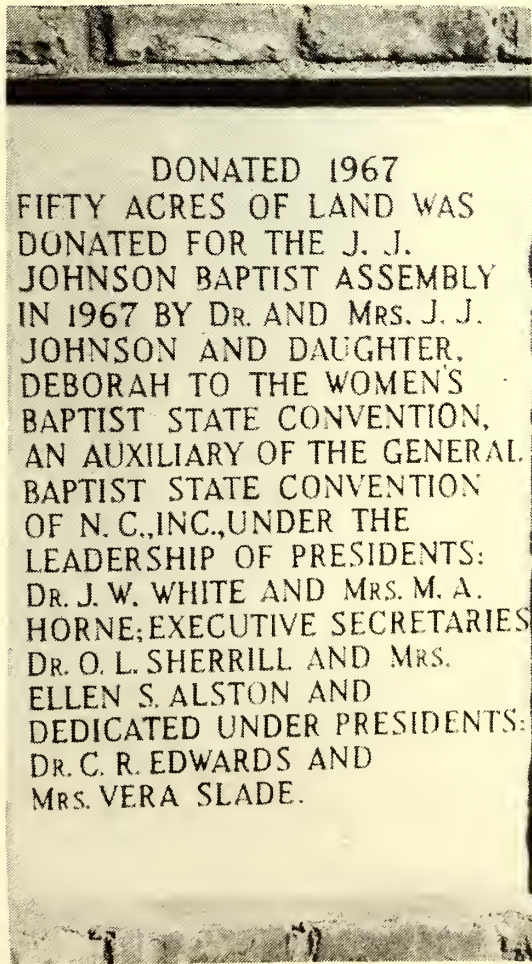
You have heard of individuals who have risen from poverty to riches, but there is a brown-skinned native of Robeson County (with a multi-racial background) who has risen from tenant farmer's last of 13 children to become Tarheelia's second Negro legislator in this century and the titular head of the 300,000 black Baptists in his native State.

Joy Joseph Johnson of Fairmont, through his early acceptance of Christianity, and soon becoming a minister, civic leader and attachment to the program of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, found himself elected the first Negro councilman of his native Fairmont, where he is now still the pastor of the First Baptist (Negro) Church, despite the fact that he has gone on to the North Carolina General Assembly.

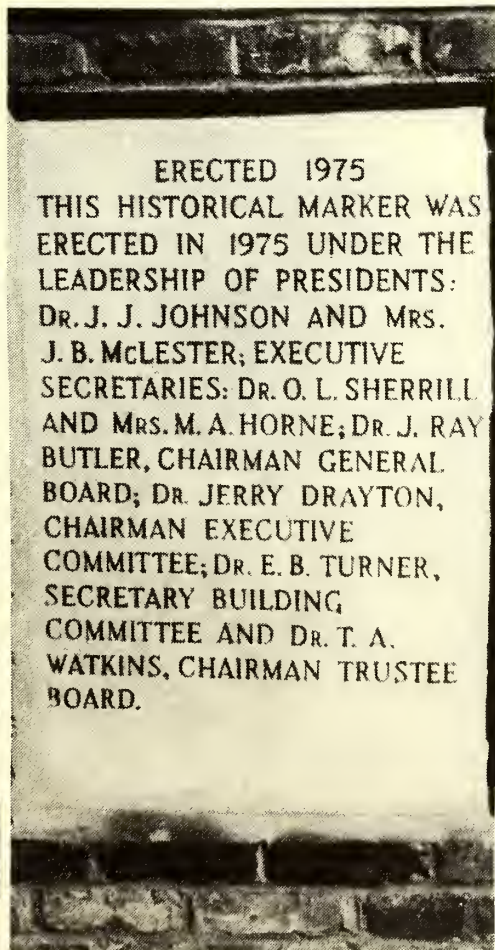
These accomplishments have earned for "Jay Jay Jay" a doctorate degree.

## Catholics Withdraw Booklet

New York (AP) — Under pressure of the U.S. Roman Catholic bishops, the main national organization of Catholic lay members has halted distribution of a study booklet critical of American values, the government and the Church.

But the decision has stirred controversy, and William H. Sandweg, a Washington, D.C., attorney and president of the National Council of Catholic Men, expressed hope it would be reversed.

"There needs to be some rethinking about it," he said "We reacted as children do to authority and simply capitulated without being given specific reasons for it and without being heard ourselves."

He said the adult educational booklet, 'Question of Values,' deliberately raises questions about conditions in Church and society, and that critical thinking about these matters was necessary and healthy.

The booklet was issued last January by the National Council of Catholic Laity, a merged umbrella group including national lay organizations both of Catholic men and women, in a project funded at \$20,000.

But after the bishops' administrative board, at its spring meeting, objected to the booklet, the 24-member board of the lay organization decided in a split vote to withdraw it.

A bishops' staff critique, sent to the lay group at the time, charged that the booklet reflected "extreme anti-institutionalism" and near moral relativism.

The booklet was written by William Maher, an editor for the old Atomic Energy Commission, and author of a previously best-selling Catholic study book, "The Spirit of Renewal." Bishop James S. Rausch of Washington, secretary to the bishops, said they did not arbitrarily suppress the book, but simply advised against continuing, and the lay group made that decision on its own.

"The fundamental issue here is whether the bishops should simply remain passive when a national Catholic organization attempts, sincerely but mistakenly, to palm off a bad piece of work on the dioceses," Bishop Rausch said.

He said he feels the bishops acted responsibly in raising objections.

Withdrawal of the booklet first was reported this week by the National Catholic Reporter, an independent weekly published in Kansas City.

It said that John Cardinal Krol of Philadelphia, former president of the bishops, and Archbishop Francis Furey of San Antonio had been among influential bishops raising complaints about the booklet.
