WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. — "Stewardship" is the one word that adequately describes the over - all 'theme' that ran like a golden thread throughout the All Baptist Assembly, held recently in Winston - Salem. Seen in the photo, is Dr. J.J. Johnson, president of the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, bowed in prayer as the All Baptist Assembly was officially declared open for business. Following the official opening by Dr. Johnson, each auxiliary president came forward and declared their department in session and announced the time that that particular auxiliary would be in charge of the Assembly Session.

The dominating theme of the Assembly was "Stewardship". Under the leadership of president Johnson, the General Baptist Convention has been directed towards a greater responsibility for stewardship in Christian endeavors. The underlying principle that motivates the stewardship emphasis is that of Christian productivity. Dr. Johnson has pointed out that to be a Christian is to invest one's life in the cause of Christ's Church. The outstanding fact of investment is demonstrated through the planting of a seed: it always returns more than is planted; there is a definite increase when healthy seeds are planted. Therefore, Dr. Johnson has declared to Black Baptists that the cause for much of our non-productivity is due primarily to the lack of investment of lives and resources into the cause of Christ. He says: "first give your life to Christ, total commitment, then work at your task with all the talents and skill that you possess, and there will be an increase in your resources:

there will be abundance."

This application of the Christian principle has truly paid off in great dividends for the General Baptist Convention of North Carolina. More people

are employed than ever before with higher salaries. The convention workers are reaching more people than ever before and the Unified Program is receiving greater support than

ever.

What all of this says to Baptists is that: "what God has entrusted to us is to be used to promote Righteousness and the Kingdom of Jesus Christ." We are therefore being called upon to become more responsible and better stewards of the Lord's work. "God will not bless the lazy and the dishonest", declares president Johnson. He urges everyone to rise to the defense of the poor and the underprivileged. He urges pastors to trust God and give the Tithe, preach the Gospel without fear or favor, and live the Christian life. According to his teaching we can only be blessed when we begin to "practice" Christianity: it is not enough just to believe it and talk about it."

In the President's Annual Address, he challenged the Convention to commit itself to a larger stewardship through the adoption of seventeen (17) far-reaching recommendations, which The Assembly unanimously adopted. (See President's Recommendations, in this issue of the Informer).

Dynamic Speakers Electrified Convention

Winston - Salem — One of the three major convention speakers that kept the Assembly electrified and inspired from the opening night until the closing morning was Dr. F.G. Sampson, pastor, Tabernacle Baptist Church, Detroit, Michigan. He was the key note speaker for the Third Annual Fellowship Banquet, sponsored by the Woman's Convention. He issued a call for Black people and all Christians to strive to go beyond mere survival and to discover what it means to "be". Dr. Sampson said that being "Black and proud" is worthless unless one has first become "a worthwhile personality that just happens to be Black." His was a

challenge to put off the superficial shell of materialism and seek the true values of Righteousness." Ones does not have to be poor to suffer the judgment of God; the soul can starve to death in the midst of affluence", declared Sampson.

On Tuesday morning, Rev. R.E. Devoe, pastor of Shiloh Baptist Church, Shelby, again electrified The Assembly with his Dynamic message "A Lost Sense of Mission", based on Ezekiel 37..." O ye dry bones, hear the word of the Lord". He stated that: "The Church ought to loose Herself in order to find her life: making an analogy of the dry bones and the Church, he declared that only the spirit of

God can renew the strength of the church and nation.

The finishing touches were put on the Spiritual feast on Thursday morning by Rev. Robert Wilson, pastor of the St. John Baptist Church, Dallas, Texas. It was as though a "Ball of fire" had struck The Assembly Hall when Rev. Wilson delivered the President's Prayer Breakfast Sermon Address. His subject was: "For the Healing of the Land", based on 2 Chronicles 7:14 which says: "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal

their land." He declared that the destiny of the individual is wrapped up with the destiny of his country (land). The initiative for healing the land must be taken by the people of God... not by God or sinners. The healing is dependent on God's people's respect or the covenant relationship with God.

According to Rev. Wilson, America is sick because God's people are unfaithful; have not put God first; nor have they honored Him in their lives.

Rev. Wilson stated that the prescription for healing is for God's people to humble themselves, re - establish genuine worship, and repent of their sins.

Christian Freedom And Responsibility

 Winston - Salem — (Editor's Note: The Following is the complete text of president Johnson's annual address to the All Baptist Assembly meeting in the Benton Convention Center, Winston - Salem, August 2-5.)
 John 8:30-36

30. As He spake these words, many believed on Him.

31. Then said Jesus to those Jews which believed on Him, If ye continue in My Word, then are ye my disciples indeed.

32. And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.

33. They answered Him, we be Abraham's seed, and were never in bondage to any man: How sayest thou, ye shall be made free?

34. Jesus answered them, verily, verily, I say unto you, whosoever committeth sin is the servant of sin.

35. And the servant abideth not in the house for ever: But the son abideth ever.

36. If the son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed.

Galatians 3:21-29

21. Is the law then against the promises of God? God forbid: for if there had been a law given which could have given life, verily righteousness should have been by the law.

22. But the scripture hath concluded all under sin, that the promise by faith of Jesus Christ might be given to them that believe.

23. But before faith come, we were kept under the law, shut up unto the faith which should afterwards be revealed.

24. Wherefore the law was our schoolmaster to bring us unto Christ, that we might be justified by faith.

25. But after that faith is come, we are no longer under a schoolmaster.

26. For ye are all the children of God by faith in Jesus Christ.

27. For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ.

28. There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female: for ye are all one in Christ Jesus.

29. And if ye be Christ's then are ye Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise.

Definition of Christian Freedom and Responsibility

Christian freedom means the liberty to act under the principles and practices of Judeo - Christianity as dictated by Jesus and governed by the disciplines and doctrines of the New Testament Church. Therefore Christian freedom is circumscribed, limited and bound by the teachings of Jesus and the New Testament. The only freedom we have is to act under the bounds of the Holy Bible or operate between the lids of the Bible subject to the rules of the master.

Responsibility means assuming our rightful share of the load according to our several abilities. That is taking up the cross of Jesus daily through vicarious suffering and sacrificing for and with the poor, rejected, neglected, despised, deprived, destituted, and lost. It means assuming our responsible roles and duties as good stewards, by positive witnessing for Jesus in the world. These are definite and concrete signs of Christian responsibility. Our Commission (responsibility) was given by the Master upon His return to Heaven - "Go ye therefore into all the world and herald (broadcast) the Good News of the Gospel - Preach, teach, observe, obey all my commandments and surely I will never leave you or let you down."

The scriptural references John 8:30-36. True freedom comes only from the Theos Logos - God's Word - The Great Emancipator, Jesus. These words are the result of a genuine life experience. The exposure of an adulterous woman by religious Jewish leaders.

The experience teaches Christian liberty and responsibility. The scene opens with the scribes and pharisees bringing a notorious adulteress before Jesus for condemnation. However in the moving drama, Jesus condemns the religious Jewish leaders instead. Then Jesus interrogates the woman where upon she confesses her ignorance of salvation and guilt. Jesus senses her devotion and instantly forgives and makes an unconditional pardon on the spot. The once adulterous woman, now the virtuous woman, suddenly volunteers to come a local missionary by broadcasting the Good News: "Come and see the only man that has satisfied my desires by spontaneously putting a spring of living water in my soul with a permanent spout quencing all my earthly thirst."

It was the finite and infinite having a confrontation at the neighborhood well - Jacob's well; the saviour and the sinner wrestling with corruption and conscience.

The purpose of the story was to confirm the mission of Jesus in the world, especially to the Jews. His mission - regeneration not reformation; redemption not prosecution; sanctification not condemnation; dedication not persecution; to expose sin not the sinner; to exercise love not the law; to make no exception to sex, religion or race; and to show that grace and mercy are equally available to all.

The truth is the crux and center of the dialogue. The greater, emancipator liberates all sinners from bondage but truth liberates the soul fully and cast out all fear, frustration and doubt. Therefore, the Christian free souls cannot enslave, since Jesus is the Master of us all. Of course we are free only on the Master's plantation. When we leave His plantation, we become

The President's Recommendations To The All Baptist Assembly

The Benton-Center, Winston-Salem
 August 4, 1976

I. That the General Baptist State Convention establish Uniform Standards, Criteria, Curricula and Certification for all Christian Training and workers in the Convention Auxiliaries and cooperating associations, district conventions, regions, unions and churches under the Department of Christian Education.

II. That each cooperating association shall establish a Department of Christian Education with a Board of Christian Education, Christian Education Director and Dean.

III. That the Association's Director, and dean, and instructors shall be certified by the Convention's Board of Education and Director.

IV. That the Association's Christian Education Director shall hold a degree in Christian Education or Religion.

V. That the qualifications for Certification of Association deans, instructors, counselors, and missionaries shall be established by the Convention's Board and shall be recommended by the Association's Board of Education and director.

VI. That all Christian workers be adequately compensated for their work. The Christian church must be the first to demonstrate equity, justice, prudence, fair play, love and concern and not follow the world's standards and scales. We are to give pressed down and running over measures. Low wages and skimpy measurements are not the teachings of Christ nor the New Testament. The Church prices for goods and services should not exceed the fair market value. The Christian Church and Convention must be competitive on the open market for goods and services. No Christian Worker should be compensated less than the Federal minimum wage and Certified Teachers not less than \$100.00 weekly with room and board plus travel. We must begin conducting quality institutes and not quantity. The institutes are to emphasize Christian Training and Biblical knowledge not fund raising and preaching. Concentrate on Stewardship, Church Membership, Officers' Duties, Baptist Beliefs, Policies, Practices and just the Bible. No point in Training members how to perform duties and hold positions when they do not believe in giving. Train them to be good stewards first.

VII. That the Convention's Board of Christian Education and Director may schedule, plan and program "Flying and Boat" world-wide Christian tours and seminars for Certification, Credits and tax deductions or they in conjunction with Foreign Christian Colleges and Universities foster the same but all in cooperation with the Convention's Transportation Committee.

VIII. That the Certificate issued shall be as indicated by sample. (See sample Certificate)

IX. That copies of all Convention Associational or Auxiliary Institutes be maintained by the Convention's Office Christian Education. Therefore copies of all Associational and Auxiliary Institute Records shall be forward within five (5) days following close of institute to the Baptist Headquarters office of Christian Education.

X. The Convention's Board of Christian Education and director shall plan and conduct quarterly certification workshops for Associational directors, deans, instructors, camp counselors, missionaries and all Christian workers. The workshops are to be conducted at the J.J. Johnson Baptist Assembly weekends or any other place and time designated by the Convention's Board of Education.

XI. That a Convention Christian Education Task force be designated by the President to initiate a Massive Christian Education Training Program to help eradicate Biblical and denominational illiteracy and that the Task Force be named and called in Session within 30 days.

XII. That the General Baptist Convention churches incorporate Christian Education forums in their Sunday Morning Worship. On Church Membership, Discipline, Doctrine, Baptist Policy, Practice stewardship and relevant issues.

A ten minute prepared message by a qualified person is more effective, informative and reach more members than a two hour ill-prepared message with a dozen people. We must train the people while they are present.

XIII. That the Trustees of the Convention be authorized to begin Preliminary Plans for the Construction of our First Unit. Retirement-Retreat Complex. That is secure drawings, designs and cost of construction and not exceed \$75,000.00 for the Construction of the First Unit. That the Trustees make their Preliminary report January 14, 1977.

XIV. That the Convention establish an Endowment for Shaw University and the Shaw Divinity School. That the Endowment Resources come from special gifts, grants, wills, royalties, payroll deductions and insurances or any other legitimate untapped resource.

XV. That the Convention establish an Endowment for Shaw University and the Shaw Divinity School. That the endowment Resources come from special gifts, grants, wills, royalties, payroll deductions and insurances or any other legitimate untapped resource.

XV. That the Board of Higher Education be authorized to investigate the feasibility of such endowment and report on January 14, 1977 their findings.

XVI. That Blacks assume their civic responsibilities with pride and dignity by serving on boards, commissions and juries without fear of intimidations and reprisals. Many times they can be the catalyst in giving a just verdict or decision.

XVII. That all Black Registered Voters go to the polls August 17 and the November General Election and vote for the candidates with performances not promise and that exemplify Christian concern for all people regardless to race; religion, creed, color, national origin, sex or party.

subjects of another master and with run-away slave status. We are no longer under our Master's guidance and protection. We lose our freedom, privileges, rights and opportunities when we leave the Master's plantation even though we are indentured slaves, with the Master's brand and identity that is stamped with the blood of Jesus but when we get out of the providence of God, we are on Satan's territory. We can come home and He will pardon but the danger is there.

Galatians chapter three begins by saying, "O Foolish Galatians, who hath bewitched you, that ye should not obey the truth, before whose eyes Jesus Christ hath been evidently set forth, crucified among you? ... But that no man is justified by the law in the sight of God, it is evident for the just shall live by faith ... wherefore then serveth the law?" It was added because of transgression ... there is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female, for ye are all one in Christ Jesus. And if ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promises."

These verses indicate love is in lieu of the law. There is no confusion or conflict, love takes precedence over the law. The law reveals but love conceals; the law executes but love commutes; the law confirms but love affirms; the law demands but love commands; the law makes judgments but love makes atonements; the law rectifies but love justifies; the law condemns but love redeems; the law convicts but love converts; the law seeks justice but love seeks mercy; the law provides penalties but love provides penitence, the law provides bonds but love provides blessings; the law grants fines but love compliments; the law restrains but love consents; the law enforces but love embraces; the law decrees but love frees.

It is therefore the responsibility of Christians to carry out the love mission of Jesus. We are to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world. We are not the wrecking crew but the construction team of goodwill. We are the New Testament Covenant Christian, not the Church constitution framers. Not lawmakers but love makers; not saints but sinners saved by grace.

The world is looking to the Christian church for moral integrity not congress and the courts. The world wants to see some Abrahams, Moses, Davids, Esters, Ruths, Peters, James, Johns, Pauls, Marys, and Marthas in the neighborhood churches — not some Wayne Hayes, Wilbur Mills, nor Elizabeth Rays or Coleen Gardners.

The Christians were given the call, command, commission and assurance by Jesus to go into all the world and tell the Good News and He would not leave us or let us down.

The Colossian Christians (Colossians 3:1-2, 9-17) are told to set their affection on things above not on things on the earth. "For ye are dead and your life hid

with Christ in God. Ye have put off the old man with his deeds, and put on the new man, which is renewed in knowledge after the image of Him that created Him. Where there is neither Greek nor Jew, circumcision nor uncircumcision, barbarian, scythian, bond nor free, but Christ is all, and in all. Put on therefore, as the elect of God, Holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, long-suffering; forbearing one another, and forgiving one another, if any man have a quarrel against any: even as Christ forgave you, so also do ye. And above all these things put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness and let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to the which also ye are called in one body; and be thankful. Let the Word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord. And what so ever ye do in word or deed, do all in the Name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by Him."

According to U.S. News and World Report — June 14th issue: Religious cults are on the rise. They are the magnets and mystics of youth. The cults offer love, peace, freedom, fellowship, friendship, and joy to the lonely.

By the hundreds of thousands, these youths are living and working on behalf of new-found beliefs and leaders. Such converts can be seen roaming the streets of U.S. cities, selling incense as oriental monks or singing gospel hymns, and taking up collections. At present, anywhere from one million to three million Americans, mostly in their 20's or late teens are involved in 200 to 1000 cults. Cultism, however, is not a new development in America. Over the centuries based sects have built up and lost - looking for dogmas and panaceas ranging from free love to snake handling.

Today, the nations "New Believers" vary widely from oriental meditators to bands of youth waiting in the desert for saviors due to arrive in spaceships from the same kingdoms that Christ came from. What enables such groups to prosper? Many religious and social analysts point to a large reservoir of troubled youth in the U.S. — some involved in drugs, and others, with traditionally devout views that crack, often from home to college. These youth are attracted to the authoritarian images presented by many cult leaders. For such young people, religious fervor runs at a high pitch!

Many of the cults exploit the youth sexually and financially. Some youth are turned over to a deprogrammer for many days and hours in a locked room to rid the young person of cultist beliefs.

Some of the largest and controversial cults in U.S. are the Unification Church established in U.S. in 1972 and headed by Sun Myong Moon. A millionaire industrialist from Korea with a U.S. membership of 30,000, average age 24, with an annual income of 12 - 100 million dollars; the Divine Light Mission established in the U.S. five years ago by Prem Pal Singh Rawat, 18, known by Guru Maharaj Ji, claims a membership 50,000, the Denver headquarter reported an annual income of 3 million dollars; the International Society For Krishna Consciousness, it claims a membership of 2,000 flowing robed Krishna chanters; the Church of Scientology established in 1954 claims a membership of 60,000. Estimated income 50 to 300 million dollars annually. Instead of monastic disciplines, Scientology emphasizes processing members with an electronic device called an E-meter to heal emotional traumas, founder L. Ron Hubbard, science-fiction writer, engineer and U.S. Naval

officer; and the Children of God, headed by David (Moses Berg) claims a membership of 3,500 with 120 communes. Their funds come from membership donations and street solicitations.

Religious scholars and some parents suggest that cults may be socially beneficial to certain young people considering the high rates of crimes, suicides, and other destructive behavior among youth today. Irving Q. Zaretsky, Co-editor of Religious Movements in contemporary America, "observes," many entered cults to get free from drugs, and their rehabilitation rates are rather high compared with government programs. What will happen if we cut off this relatively healthy outlet or antidote for anti-social behavior?

How long will the present crop of cult continue to flourish? Martin Marty of the University of Chicago Divinity School, sees signs that they may have peaked. None of today's cults will show the staying power of such dissenting faiths as the Jehovah's Witness and Mormons. These groups were able to survive persecution and grow because they offered a structure of belief that would support people through life and would encourage them to raise their children in the church.

It is the responsibility of the Christian church to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world not merely to condemn and condone the cultists but to compel and command them to follow Jesus by precepts and examples.

Finally, Christians have civic, social, economic, educational, and racial responsibilities as well as religious responsibilities.

Wingate Will Go To Four Year Status

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (BP) — Wingate College, a two-year Baptist institution near here, has been approved for four-year status by the North Carolina Baptist State Convention General Board.

Wingate, founded in 1896 as a high school, became a junior college in the mid-1930's. The school has been affiliated with the North Carolina Convention since 1949.

Wingate will begin offering four-year baccalaureate programs in only a few disciplines, aiming for accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in 1979. The school will still place major emphasis on the two-year program, a board spokesman told the Baptist Courier, newsmagazine of South Carolina Baptists.

Additional Resolutions Adopted At All Baptist Assembly

Winston-Salem — In addition to the seventeen (17) recommendations of President Johnson; The All Baptist Assembly adopted the following ten (10) resolutions, made jointly by President Johnson, the Executive Committee and the General Board.

1. That the Convention support Rev. Ben Chavis and the Wilmington Ten in their Fight for Freedom, as well as fight all social and political repressions.
2. That the Department of Corrections be condemned by the Convention for such poor records in providing efficient and adequate medical care and protection of the inmates.
3. That the Convention go on record requesting the 1977 General Assembly to provide adequate funds for Medical Services, Care and Chaplains for all Prison Units.
4. That the Convention through her Christian influence and integrity demand that the next Governor of North Carolina appoint Blacks to head some significant State Departments and Agencies, such as Human Resources, Corrections, Human Relations and to all Boards and Commissions such as Transportation and Paroles. Also that the same demand be made of All Other State, National, County and City appointed and elected officials.
5. That this Convention go on record for Law and Order in this State and Nation, based on equal justice and treatment for all.
6. That in this Bicentennial Year, the General Baptist Convention call upon every General Baptist Family and Christian to re-establish the Family Altar.
7. That the Convention support the Equal Rights Amendment.
8. That the Convention support a Statewide Fair Housing and Employment Act with firm regulations and enforcement provisions.
9. That the Convention support viable Landlord-Tenant and Migrant Labor Camp Legislation with high standards and strict enforcement provisions.
10. That the Convention call upon the Honorable James E. Holshouser, Jr. to reactivate the Human Relations Council that it may be viable and responsive to the needs of Minorities and appoint a Black Director.

Mrs. J.B. McLester, president of the Woman's Convention, auxiliary of the General Baptist State Convention, Inc., stated that the theme, "Christian Freedom and Responsibility", calls upon each individual to give an account of their Christian Stewardship.

Mrs. M.A. Horne, executive secretary-treasurer, expressed her gratitude to "Our heavenly Father for bringing us through another year". "Sometimes", she continued, "the clouds were dark, the way was rugged, at times the ship was tossed to and fro, but we made the voyage safely, because a man was on board named Jesus."

Total amount of money given for objectives was \$47,555.80 during the week and \$228,282.76 for the year. Exceeded last Convention year by \$10,898.81.

Lucas, Kings Mountain; chairman; Largest number of reported Souls Won for Christ, District 7, Group 2, Miss Ethel Standfield, Durham, a total of 414.

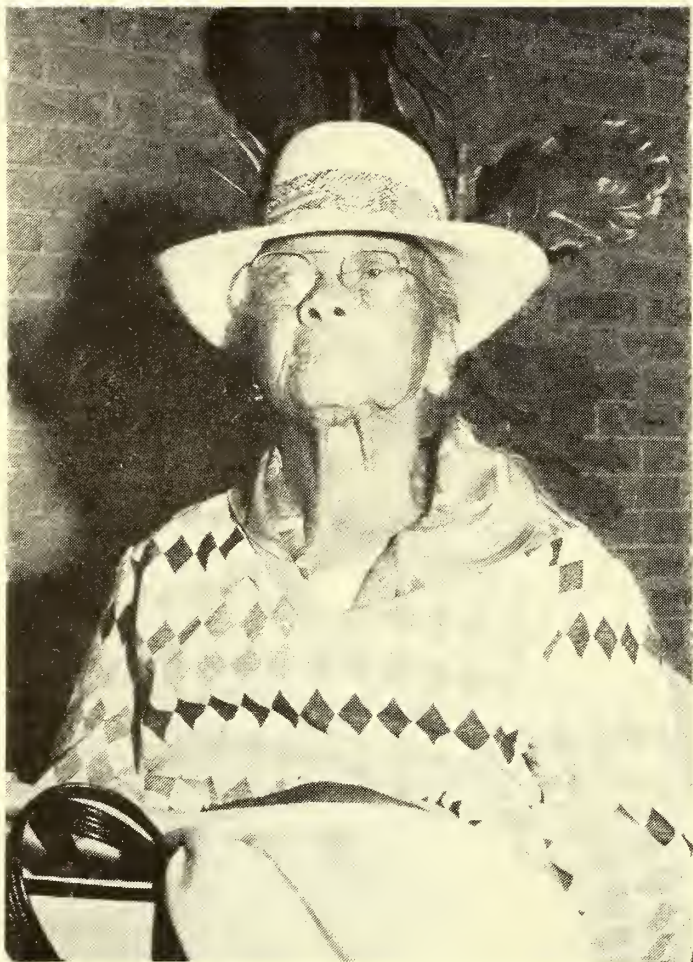

Rev. Leon White Receives 1st Annual Freedom Award

WINSTON-SALEM — The Reverend Leon White, outspoken leader of the North Carolina Task Force seeking to abolish the death penalty; has become the first recipient of the "First Annual Freedom Award". This award is given by the General Baptist State Convention to an individual who has shown unusual concern in the area of Social and Political Concern. The photo shows the award being presented by President Johnson. Leon White is secretary to the N.C. and Va. Chapter of the Commission for Racial Justice.

The following letter was read as part of the ceremony as Reverend White received the award:

Central Prison
Raleigh, NC

TO THE GENERAL BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION

Dear Fellow Clergymen and Friends,

I wrote to you from a prison cell inside of Central Prison in Raleigh. First, I wish to take this opportunity to thank The Reverend Dr. Joy Johnson and all of you assembled who have supported the civil rights movement in North Carolina and in particular the on-going struggles to change the present unjust repressive justice system that continues to victimize so many of our people solely on the basis of skin color, economic

class, and or for the purposes of political persecution.

As you may be aware, I and my nine co-defendants, the Wilmington Ten, have been reincarcerated in the state prison system for a sum total of 282 years solely because we dared request a non-discriminatory equal quality education for Black students in Wilmington over five years ago. Since that time, despite thousands of dollars expended and long court battles, justice has not prevailed in our case. Neither has justice been rendered in the cases of the Charlotte Three, the Ayden Eleven, nor the recent Dupree trial in Henderson.

To reflect on the historic progress of our bicentennial struggle for true justice, liberty, freedom and the pursuit of happiness, we can readily affirm that by the grace of God we all have come a long way on freedom's path; however, we must be ever mindful that we still have a long way to go.

And yet there is there now hope for continuing the struggle? It is the church. Black liberation has in the past and shall continue in the future to find realization through the Black church.

Therefore it is my prayer today that the General Baptist State Convention will join in with other denominations across the country in designating Sunday,

August 15, 1976, as National Wilmington Ten Sunday and to publicly endorse and support the upcoming National March for Human Rights and Labor Rights to be held in Raleigh on Labor Day, Monday, September 6, 1976.

Even through all of the trials and tribulations, I have not lost faith. In fact my faith in Jesus Christ has only increased as I am personally witnessing man's inhumanity toward man.

More than the decision of a biased jury, more than the racism of a prosecutor, more than the unjust discretions of a judge, and more than the repressive abuses of a judicial system — your collective prayers and active participation in the Labor Day March will be more the determining factors as to when the Wilmington Ten, the Charlotte Three, and other victims of our society will eventually receive justice.

For the last one hundred days I have gone without eating food as I am continuing a "spiritual fast for justice and human rights" not just for my personal salvation but for the liberation and salvation of all oppressed people. To further dramatize the call for support of the March, I will continue to fast until after the Labor Day March.

As you meet this week please know that my prayers are with you for a successful convention.

Again please accept my humble gratitude for all your support. Let us pray, let us organize, and let us march on until the ultimate victory is won.

May the love of Jesus Christ, the grace and power of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be always with you.

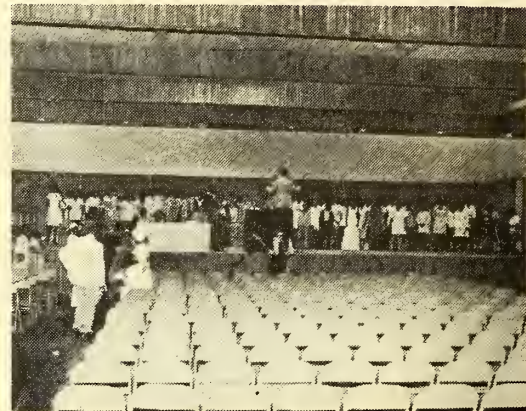


YOUTH IN ACTION

The objective of this program is to reach out into the community in an effort to meet some of the spiritual, physical and social needs of the young people by providing them with counselling services, repossession, recreation and evangelistic services. Their aim and hopes are to gradually bring about a decline in drug abuse popularity, which should eventually lead to a decrease in crime rate and the general uplifting of youth as far as morals and spiritual development are concerned. To do this they will be having special

counseling and rap sessions with youth each day at the headquarters. In addition evangelistic services are held each Saturday night at the O.I.C. Center at 7:00 p.m.

The program is financed by local churches, community organizations, and also the Baptist State Convention. This year's program is operating on a \$14,000 budget. Seven thousand of this is being raised in the community through fund raising activities and personal contributions. The program has employed nine staff members. Seven of these staff members' salaries are being subsidized and paid by other agencies. Three of the major fund raising activities sponsored by the Youth Crusade are the bottle drive, bumper sticker drive, and the Miss YCA Pageant.

The program is experiencing much success in the community and has already proven to be one of the most effective youth programs to be presented in Rocky Mount.

Shaw Begins 112th Year Of Christian Leadership And Service

Raleigh — (Editor's note: This featured article concerning Shaw University is the second in a series of articles which are to be published in connection with the General Baptist State Convention's Program of monthly emphasis of the Convention's six (6) Objectives. In the month of emphasis, all Baptists, Convention Auxiliaries, Associations, Pastors, and Departments are

requested to emphasize that objective and secure as much financial support as possible.)

Shaw University will begin its 1976 - 77 academic year with a projected enrollment of about 450 new students and 750 returning students. Students are expected from 23 states, the District of Columbia and 10 foreign countries, with approximately 55 percent from North Carolina.

The University has a full time faculty of 70, 41 percent of whom have earned doctorate degrees.

Under the leadership of Dr. Richard L. Fields, Acting President, the university is forecasting a year of progress and growth, with special emphasis being placed on

strengthening existing academic programs, initiating innovative alternative educational delivery systems and providing expanded cultural and educational services to the community.

The university continues to offer curricular and major

programs through four academic divisions: Humanities and Arts, Natural and Physical Science, Teacher Education, and Administrative and Urban Sciences.

Among the special curricular programs are the Academic Skills Program, featuring an electronic laboratory facility to assist in teaching basic skills in English, reading and mathematics to students who may have deficiencies in those areas; the Evening School, a bachelor's degree program for busy adults and working students, with courses scheduled evenings during the week and on weekends; the Speech and Hearing Clinic, the Family Day Care Program, and the development of new programs in accounting and criminal justice.

The Shaw University Chorale Society, the University Band, the United Heritage Gospel Choir and the Shaw Players and Company Theatrical Group, along with visiting artists and lecturers, will provide a series of educational and cultural programs which will be available to the general community.

Shaw University, founded in 1865, is an independent, Baptist related college whose founder established it for the purpose of teaching freedmen to read and interpret the Bible. This led to the formal training of ministers and teachers, doctors, lawyers, pharmacists, and professionals in a variety of areas.

Through the decades, the university has continued to adjust its goals and objectives within the framework of its motto, "Pro Christo et Humanity" — For Christ and Humanity.

Shaw Evening School Opens In September

RALEIGH, N.C. — The Shaw University Evening School with courses scheduled at night during the week and on weekends offers a special opportunity to busy adults and working students to pursue a college education. Persons who might not otherwise have the opportunity to enroll in college courses or to pursue a degree can find at Shaw selected courses of study that will accommodate their individual schedules.

The Evening School program is composed of several components including regularly scheduled classes, directed independent study, internships, cooperative education, and course exemption examinations. By combining flexible course scheduling with these unique features for course offerings, busy adults and working students can proceed toward their degree within the traditional four - year period.

Students may select a program of study that combines several of the components of the Evening School, or they may attend only the evening or

weekend components.

Courses of study leading to a Bachelor's degree are available in public administration - criminal justice, business management and economics, behavioral science, liberal studies, and accounting.

The program is open to all adults and working students who have completed high school or hold a high school equivalency certificate. Students are offered the opportunity to accelerate their program through the College Level Examination Program (CLEP) and by institutional departmental examinations.

Applications must be submitted by August 1 for the September registration and by December 1 for the January registration.

Electronic Lab Supports Programs At Shaw

RALEIGH — Shaw University has recently completed the repair and refurbishing of an electronic laboratory facility for primary use in the Academic Skills Program. The Skills Program, a component of the Advanced Institutional Development Program, is designed to teach basic skills in English, Reading and Mathematics to students who come to college with deficiencies in those areas.

The newly re - worked laboratory, which is housed in two classrooms on the third floor of Leonard Building, can accommodate as many as fifty students at one time — thirty in one room and twenty in an adjoining classroom.

The original electronic laboratory, installed in 1965, was then used primarily by the foreign language and business education students.

From a master control console in the main section, the in-

structor can send the same lesson to fifty students or several different lessons to meet individual needs. The instructor can listen to and confer with students as they do various types of exercises or drills from reel - to - reel tapes, cassettes, or other recorded media.

Eighteen student positions are equipped with individual control panels which permit students to control their personal programs. They may listen individually, do drill work, record answers, repeat any part of a given lesson, erase their taped answers, or re - record as they wish. At the same time, the instructor can monitor and give instruction to the entire group or to individuals. The students' tapes can be replayed at the instructor's convenience for evaluation purposes.

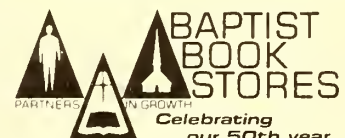

Men, women, boys and girls began converging on Winston - Salem as early as Sunday, August 1, for the Pre-assembly Musical. They came by several modes of transportation, and some groups included whole families.

Hundreds of happy souls engaged in hearty fellowship and a delicious meal at the sumptuous banquet sponsored by the Woman's Convention on Monday evening. Dr. F.G. 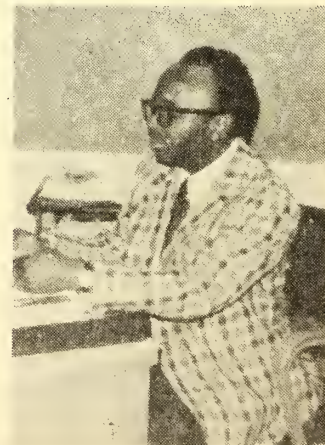

Ford Nominates Stevens For Broadcast Slot

FORT WORTH (BP) — President Gerald Ford has nominated Paul M. Stevens, president of the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission here, as a director of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

Stevens, a Democrat, was told of his nomination in a telephone call from the office of Richard Brannon, a Baptist, who is associate director of the presidential personnel office.

The nomination, expected to be announced since the middle of June, still must be confirmed by the Senate, Brannon said.

"It's a matter of getting the confirmation on the Senate calendar," he said. "Dr. Stevens will have to appear before a sub-committee. We don't expect any problems with it. I have no doubt he'll be confirmed."

Stevens, an ordained Baptist minister has led the Radio and Television Commission since 1953. The Baptist agency is one of the world's largest producers of religious programs for broadcasting. Radio and Television Commission - produced programs are heard on more than 3,710 radio and television stations across America on public service time. They are broadcast in 12 languages and heard by an estimated 100 million people weekly. In addition, the American Forces Radio - TV Service regularly schedules several commission programs.

Stevens says his interest lies in keeping the broadcasting process free of government intervention. At the Texas Association of Broadcasters meeting in Arlington recently, he told a Dallas newscaster that one of his concerns is "keeping government intervention in the broadcasting process at an absolute minimum" and wants the broadcasting process to "remain absolutely constitutional."

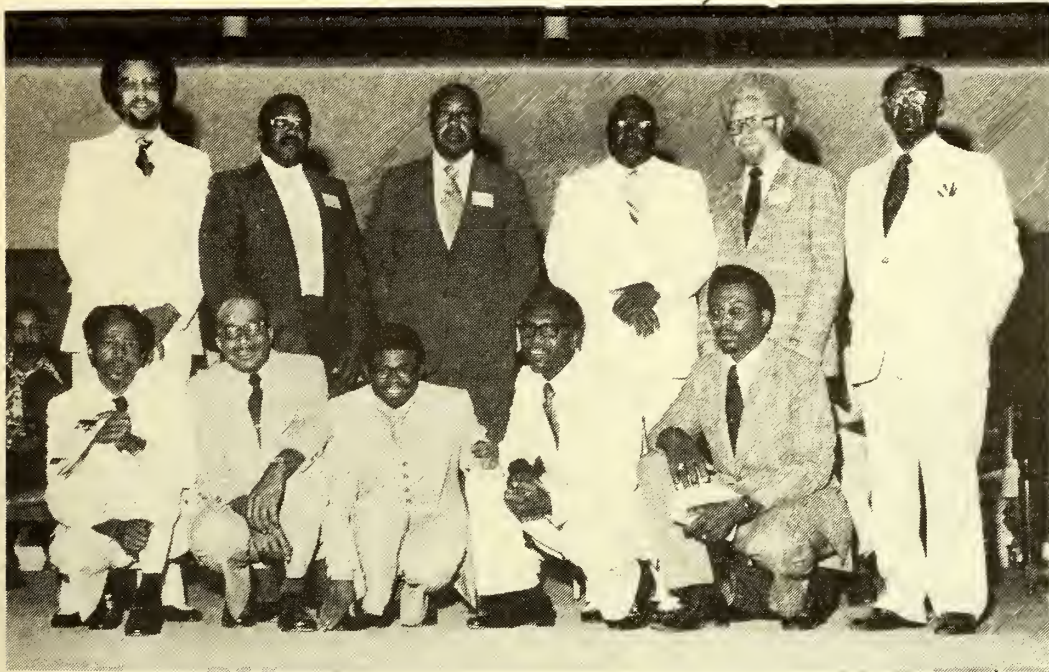
Stevens has been an outspoken advocate of the family viewing hour on television and has been quoted as being strongly against violence and sex on television.

St. Louis Agency To Aid Elderly

ST. LOUIS (RNS) — A grant of \$18,900 has been made to the Cardinal Ritter Institute (CRI) for the Aging to develop a pilot project of services for the "downtown elderly."

This group, spotlighted by a special institute study last year, consists of elderly and retired persons following a "Single Room Only" life style in downtown hotels and rooming houses. Although not destitute, these people have a number of unmet social and emotional needs not generally recognized because of their solitary existence, a spokesman said.

The grant, from the Missouri Office of Aging, will be used to develop a service program which may be used for similar population groups in the downtown sections of other cities.

The Strength To Love

Editor's Note: The following is the oscar-winning editorial written by Editor Roy Parker, Jr. of The FAYETTEVILLE TIMES. Reprinted here by his permission.

NEW YORK—Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said it best in a sermon entitled "The Strength To Love."

"While abhorring segregation, we shall love the segregationist. This is the only way to create the beloved community," he vowed.

King's vision of a society reconciled to itself reached a new milestone Thursday night in the scene at Madison Square Garden as the Democratic Party heard a southerner accept its presidential nomination.

For, as Jimmy Carter has acknowledged, the South first had to reconcile its own tragic divisions before it could then proffer reconciliation to the country.

That was Martin Luther King's dream, and the strength to love was his method. The scene at Madison Square Garden showed how far that dream had come and how well that method can work.

For on the platform as the Democrats sang the old song of civil rights strife, "We Shall Overcome," there sat George Corley Wallace, who once vowed "segregation yesterday, segregation today, segregation forever." And Wallace was fairly bathed in the love, the waves of almost inexpressible relief, that southerners both black and white, felt as the success of Carter in winning the presidential nomination wrote an end to the long years of bitterness and division and waste of human talent which segregation and racial discrimination had placed as a burden on them.

For, in a real sense, the success of Carter

is the South's opportunity to show the way toward Dr. King's vision to every region and place. The problems which Dr. King rose up to smite are still with us, even in the South. But his work and his method made it possible for a political party to adopt his vision as a goal. The success which his method had in his own region made it possible for Jimmy Carter to win the Democratic nomination and lift the burden which racial politics had placed on the South.

So, in an almost palpable sense, Dr. King was at the event in Madison Square Garden. It was "his" convention, as Carter has acknowledged. When Martin Luther King stood up and called for "the strength to love," he set the course which led to Madison Square Garden.

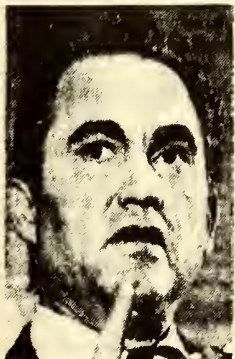
The South, which has been a burden to the nation's conscience, has thus been able to offer itself now as an example that the American conscience is, as Jimmy Carter said, one of "simple decency and common-sense."

In all this, perhaps movements and trends are more important than men. Carter could not have done what he did without King doing what he did. And King was working out of the ground laid by thousands before him, the Frank Porter Grahams, Ellis Arnells, the Booker T. Washingtons and Martin Luther King, Seniors. And, Rosa Parks, whose feet hurt when the driver told her to move to the back of the bus on that far-off December day in Montgomery, Ala.

Yet, the scene at Madison Square Garden was surely testimony to the immense vision and practical success of the method that Martin Luther King Jr. preached when he said: "To our most bitter opponents we say, one day we shall win freedom, but not only for ourselves. We shall so appeal to your heart and conscience that we shall win YOU in the process."

If George Corley Wallace would not agree with that now, he is not the sort of southerner we suspect that he is.

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Basketball's Jerry Lucas Remembers God's Word

NASHVILLE (BP) — For more than a decade Jerry Lucas delighted fans and astounded foes shooting his patented, arching jump shot over basketball defenses.

Now he shoots at them the word of God, that is — teaching a memory system he has devised for the Bible to help Christians minister more effectively.

As a basketball player, Lucas' career was illustrious. In the realm of memory his feats have been termed phenomenal. He has written two books on memory and once memorized 500 columns of the Manhattan telephone directory. As a professional basketball player he not only memorized his own team's playbook but also the plays of opposing teams to help his defensive play.

Two years ago the former New York Knickerbocker devoted his career to God's work which led to writing a memory book for the Bible, "Remember The Word." He was in the Nashville Baptist Book Store recently to promote his book.

Lucas' basketball career reads like a fairytale — a child's dreams of stardom. As a prep star he was named All - State and All - America player for three years. Twice he led his high school team to the Ohio state championship.

A star at Ohio State University (OSU), he again played on a championship team, winning the

National Collegiate Athletic Association national championship. He was a three - time All - America selection at OSU and was named College Player of the Year twice. He earned "Sports Illustrated" magazine's Sportsman of the Year award and was presented a Greek amphora for excellence in mind and body.

Lucas was a gold medal winner in the 1960 Olympic Games as a member of the United States basketball team, which some sports writers acclaimed as the greatest U.S. team ever to compete in the world - wide games.

An All - Pro player seven years, he was voted to the National Basketball Association All - Star team seven times and played on a world championship team.

In addition to athletics, the college Phi Beta Kappa appeared on literally hundreds of national television and radio programs — from the "Mike Douglas Show" to the "Today" program — demonstrating his memory techniques.

He added to his fame as co-author of "The Memory Book." As if he couldn't fail, the book spent 50 weeks on the New York Times Bestseller List, second only to a book on Watergate.

It's an understatement to say that Lucas was at a high point in his life. He was idolized, loved and admired by millions of sports fans across the country.

By the time he was 30 he had already gained the ultimate goals of many people — fame, wealth and material possessions.

"People told me how lucky I was and how they would like to be in my position," he stated. "Little did they know how I felt about my own life. In spite of the things I had amassed, I was still empty and unfulfilled. There was a void in me that simply would not be filled no matter what I tried."

Lucas suddenly aborted his life of luxury two years ago after meeting Sharalee Beard, a pretty blonde in her mid - twenties who was a member of the Johnny Mann Singers. Sharalee, whose parents are both ordained ministers, is deeply religious herself, Lucas said. She urged him to read the Bible because she saw the need in his life.

"This led to religious discussions which I made very difficult for her," Lucas recalled, "I insisted on proof for every fact she brought up. Of course she couldn't provide documented answers."

Lucas questioned every part of Christianity but decided to accept Sharalee's challenge.

He had never read the Bible before and was "awestruck with the life and teachings of Jesus Christ, I began praying not really knowing how. Within a few weeks I received Christ as my personal Savior. My life changed. The void was filled by our Lord.

Lucas realized why events happened the way they did in his life. He saw that God had been preparing him to teach Christian people to retain their memory for God's purpose.

Retired from pro basketball and married to Sharalee, Lucas

formed a non - profit organization in Los Angeles called Memory Ministries, Inc.

He wrote "Remember the Word," a Bible memorization system for the Gospels. He says the book is non - sectarian and non-theological, dealing only with scripture memorization, not interpretation. It is usable with any scripture translation. In the future, Lucas plans to develop memory systems for the Epistles, Psalms and Proverbs.

At 36 years old, Lucas has embarked on a different journey, a more meaningful one. In addition to writing, he travels about the country leading memory seminars for Christians so they might remember God's word and establishing a worthwhile ministry in their own lives.

Jerry Lucas is still a star, only now he's performing for God.

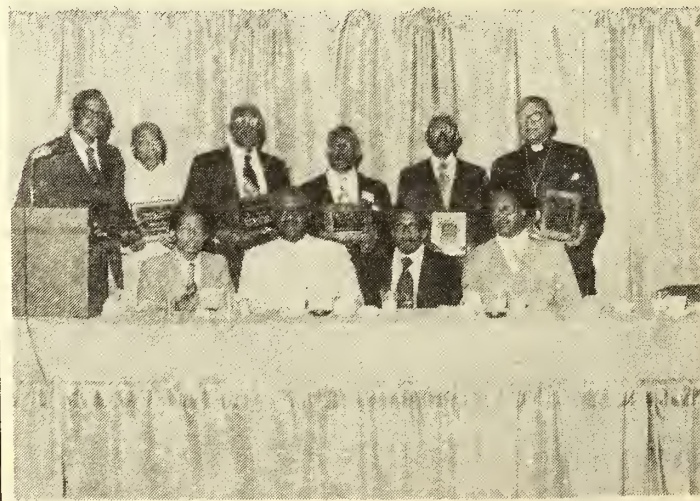
