## FROM LITTLE JOE'S CHURCH

Yet, in the goodness of God we may profit from past experiences, and give thanks for that which has been done by the grace of God. It is in this spirit of humble gratitude that we remember the year just past.

Of all that is remembered the most outstanding in my mind has been the privilege of guiding those young people who were preparing themselves for full membership in the church. We have had two communicants' classes during the past year. At Easter twenty two young people were received by the Session, and just before Christmas sixteen others took their vows before the Session and congregation of Little Joe's Church. Because these young people come from all sections of our great Synod I am giving their names so that you may know who they are.

Another group within our church that has caused us to be aware of the keen interest of our children in the matters of the Spirit are those who have recited the catechisms. Recently two sisters, Judy and Mary Jane Bolton, received from memory the Shorter Catechism and have received the award of a Bible from our Board of Christian Education in Richmond. Also, the following young folks recited from memory the Child's Catechism and have received the award of a New Testament: Naoka Spencer, Judy Pinkston, Mike Morgan, Judith Ann Rutledge, Lois Allen, Elsie Rannells, Bill Rannells and Douglas Finley. We are proud of the accomplishments of these young people and grateful for the encouragement and guidance their houseparents give them in this important work.

The combined choirs of our church presented a lovely Christmas Cantata, "The Child Jesus", with tableaux done by members of our Senior High Fellowship. Words cannot ever express the nearness of God's Presence, yet, as we worshipped our Saviour on the morning of His birth in the loveliness of our sanctuary, we knew that He had come. We knew also that He was our Emmanuel, (God with us), as we sang "Joy to the world! the Lord is come!"

Little Joe's Church was well represented at the Synod Youth Convention at Davidson College the week after Christmas. LeNair Burns, Mac McClure, Mary Emma McClure and Melvin McKenzie came back with ideas and inspiration that promise to strengthen the life of our Youth Fellowship in the year ahead.

So we move into 1956 with confidence that even as God has richly blessed us in all things through Christ in days past, so He will continue to provide for our every need in the years ahead. That each of you may share this confidence with us is our prayer as we begin a new year Under The Steeple.

The former students of Barium Springs have made a memorial gift and the pulpit in Little Joe's Presbyterian Church has been dedicated in memory of their fifteen fellow students who lost their lives in World War II. The following paper was read at the time of the Dedicatory Service:

**GASTONE ALESSANDRINI**, Private, United States Army Air Corps. A member of our community here for eight years, he was serving on a B-29 Bomber Crew which had successfully completed 34 missions from Guam. On its 35th mission the crew failed to return and Gastone was among those listed as missing in action.

**WALTER ARCHER**, Master Sergeant, United States Army. Walter, who spent 15 years here at Barium Springs, was serving in the New Guinea theatre of action at the time of his death. His outfit had completed a successful raid on a Japanese coastal position and he had gotten back on the boat safely when he noticed his commanding officer left on the beach. Disregarding his own safety, he returned to rescue the officer and was killed in the attempt.

**LEONARD FORT**, Captain, United States Army Air Corps. One of our Barium boys for ten years and a graduate of Davidson College, Leonard was serving as a bomber pilot over Austria when he was shot down. Evidence from eye witnesses is that he could have parachuted to safety, but because he had a wounded man aboard he elected to stay with the plane and bring it to a crash landing. This heroic effort cost him his life.

**JAMES DAVIDSON JOHNSTON**, Lt. Colonel, United States Army. Jim, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Johnston and a graduate of Davidson College, was killed while on reconnaissance preparatory to the attack on Cherbourg, France.

**FRED LOWRANCE**, Lieutenant, United States Army. The son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Lowrance, Fred attended Davidson College before entering the Army. He served in the Southwest Pacific theatre of action. His unit was attacking a hill on New Georgia Island when the Japanese counter attacked in force. When last seen, Fred was wounded but still firing his pistol at the enemy.

**JOHN CALVIN McMASTERS**, Private, United States Army. A member of our community for six years, he entered the Army from here and was killed in Germany in February of last year (1945). No details of his death are available.

**THOMAS MORGAN**, member of the United States Navy. After eight years at Barium, he entered the Navy and was serving in the engine room of one of our ships during the early days of the war. His ship was torpedoed and he was killed either by the explosion or by drowning when the engine room was shut off to keep the water out of the rest of the ship. He was the first Barium boy lost in the war.

**BEN MORROW**, Private, United States Army. Ben spent twelve years with us here at Barium Springs and was serving with the Army in the Philippines when the war broke out. He was captured on Bataan, endured the infamous death march, and died in a Japanese prison camp.

**THOMAS LANDRUM O'KELLY**, Lieutenant, United States Army Air Corps. He had completed one year at Mitchell College and one year at the Julliard School of Music in New York before entering the Army. While on maneuvers he flew his plane out over the Caribbean Sea and failed to return.

**DICK PARRISH**, Private First Class, United States Marine Corps. A member of our community for fifteen years and a student at Davidson College at the time of his entering the service, Dick was killed in the attack on Iwo Jima.

**BRUCE PARCELL**, Lt. Colonel, United States Army Air Corps. After spending six years at Barium Springs, Bruce went on to Davidson College and graduated there. On a mission over Germany his objective was to blow up a bridge. In order to accomplish this objective, he flew his plane to low that when he was hit he could not land and crashed to his death.

**PAUL PITTMAN**, Captain, United States Army Air Corps. A Barium Springs boy for eight years, Paul graduated from Davidson College and entered the Army before the outbreak of the war. He was serving as a test pilot and instructor when he became ill and he died in a hospital in Dallas, Texas.

**CORRIS SMITH**, Private, United States Army. He spent a year and a half at Barium Springs as a boy. After entering the Army he became a member of the 88th Artillery and was killed by shrapnel while sleeping in a dug-out in Italy.

**EUGENE WHITENER**, member of the United States Army. While serving with a Tank Destroyer Company, he was killed in Europe in the Battle of the Bulge.

**ROBERT WILKES**, member of the United States Navy. He spent eight years at Barium Springs during his youth. Serving in the Philippines at the outbreak of the war, he was captured on Bataan and endured the infamous death march afterward. At the end of the war he was rescued from a Japanese prison camp, but died in San Francisco on his way home.

## High School To Leave The Campus

The Board of Regents has instructed the superintendent of the Home to request the County Board of Education to provide for the high school children in the Troutman High School. This will eliminate the high school from the campus at Barium but the Varsity athletic program will be continued as a Home unit.

This action comes after a long and thorough study of what seems best for the children. The members of the Board of Regents and the superintendent of the Home are unanimous in the conviction that a more normal life can be obtained for the children of the Home if they attend the regular school with the other boys and girls of the community. Nearly all of the child-caring institutions have integrated their schools with the city schools or county schools in their area. It is the consensus that such a plan enables a child to grow more wholesomely and be better prepared for community living upon leaving the Home. A larger school would afford greater competition on the part of the students and a greater variety of courses. It will mean a considerable savings in the operation of the Home in combining the school with the other schools. Technically, the school at Barium Springs has been a county school under the direction of the County Board, but in its operation the Home has had the freedom in its choice of teaching staff and additional curricula material. The high school was an accredited high school of the county, but since it was housed in buildings owned by the Home and supported by the Home, the activities within the schedule could be designed to meet the wishes of the Home administration. The State support was only in the number of teachers for the number of pupils at Barium on the basis of the State teacher load. This required an additional number of teachers for the classes were smaller than the teacher load of the State.

Other items of expense have been the buildings themselves, the furniture within them, the upkeep and the utilities connected with the operation of the buildings. These factors brought about the decision to make this change.

There will of necessity be some losses sustained in this transition. Smaller number of students in classes afford individual attention from the teachers. A "controlled" schedule in an institutional situation allows for adjustments to the Home planning and the Home operation, such as serving meals in the dining room, etc. However, in the total picture the values to be gained exceed the losses sustained and

## Edwin K. Kyles, Printing Supervisor, Dies Of Heart Attack

Edwin Kenneth Kyles, age forty-six, died suddenly at his home on Wednesday afternoon, January 11th. Suffering from what he described as indigestion, he visited a doctor and then returned to his home. His pain soon became so acute that the doctor was called again and within a very short time after his arrival Mr. Kyles died from what was described as a heart attack.

Mr. Kyles was born January 29th, 1909 in Troutman, the son of the Reverend Robert S. Kyles and the late Cynthia Simpson Kyles. He attended the Troutman schools and had been employed at the Orphanage for more than a quarter of a century as the supervisor of the print shop and the shoe shop.

Mr. Kyles was an elder of Little Joe's Presbyterian Church. He was married to the former Rachel Moore of Statesville who with two children survive him in his home. Nancy Lee Kyles, the daughter, is a junior

in the high school at Barium, and Edwin Kenneth Kyles, Jr., is in the elementary school. Funeral services were conducted at Little Joe's Presbyterian Church. The Reverend Robert R. Collins, the pastor, was in charge and he was assisted by the Reverend A. B. McClure, with the burial taking place in the family plot in Troutman.

At the time of the funeral service the church was filled with the friends who had come, shocked at the news and grieved at the passing of their friend. One contemporary of Mr. Kyles remarked at that time "If I can have this many friends at my funeral and be remembered by such tokens of their appreciation such as these flowers, I will feel that I have lived well in my community." The friends of Ed Kyles, and he had a host of them, feel that he had lived well and served well in his life among the children of Barium Springs.

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## Students Get Good Health Report

Dr. William T. MacLauchlin of Conover and Dr. John Lafferty of Hickory have completed their general physical check-up of all of the students in the Home. These doctors have seen the children year after year for a number of years and they report that the general state of health is excellent. The records of the examination were kept and every defect noted, and these will be checked by other physicians or specialists during the year. A few children were discovered to have need for special attention for their feet. One child showed symptoms of rheumatic fever and a thorough examination and attention has been given him. Tonsilectomies have been recommended for some. General instruction for the loss of weight and the gaining of weight where needed have been given to the individual child and to the houseparent.

The two doctors were particularly pleased this year with the excellence of the dental care being afforded through the dental program. Dr. Lafferty remarked as he examined the boys that he could tell immediately when one of the children from the village came through the line as his teeth showed that he had not had the care from Dr. Smith Kirk, dentist for the Home. Along this same line, recently an orthodontist who had done work for the Home was quite surprised to find the excellence of work done. The regular hours, the sufficient diet, good habits, and plenty of sleep all contribute to the good sound health found in the group of boys and girls who live at Barium Springs.

## Flag To Fly Over The Campus

The Post Office at Barium Springs has purchased a big new flag which will be flown daily from the high cedar pole erected beside the Post Office. This flag pole is taking up duty in its third location. Originally, it stood in the center of the campus. It was then later removed to the football field and stood on the high bank at the north end of the field. Now, it has been removed to the Post Office building to unfurl Old Glory.

The flying of this flag will bring a symbolism to the campus for on its southern boundary will be flying the flag of the United States, representing country, and on the northern boundary will be standing high above the campus the cross of Jesus Christ on the steeple of the church. During the day, every day, as the people come and go to their cottages, their school, their work, their play, there will be standing high above them these two great symbols . . . UNDER THE STEEPLE - Nuggets of News

FROM LITTLE JOE'S CHURCH

ROBERT R. COLLINS, Minister

This month I should like to share with you some thoughts about Easter. For all Christians Easter recalls the most important day in the history of the world. Had it not been for that which occurred on this day some nineteen hundred years ago, you and I probably would never have heard of Jesus Christ. You will remember that even those disciples who had been Jesus' closest companions thought all their hopes and dreams had come to an end when Jesus was crucified. The two who walked dejectedly along the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) were certain that their hope that Christ was their redeemer was dead. But then the great moment came when the risen Christ joined them and entered into conversation with them. Still they did not know him until He made as though He would leave them, and they invited him in "to stay with them." And as they sat at the table and broke bread together "their eyes were opened and they recognized him . . ."

The experience of these two men who walked the dusty road to Emmaus is much like our own. We too often find ourselves plodding along life's way with problems and burdens too great to carry alone. Someone speaks to us, but being wrapped up in our own thoughts we pay no attention to His words. Then one day, we like them, invite this One who has been with us all the while to come into our homes. We make Him our true guest, we invite Him to break bread with us. Suddenly our eyes are opened also, and we are aware that all along it has been Christ who has sought to speak to us and reassure us. For the first time we know the true meaning of the words spoken by the angel at the tomb when he said, "He has risen, He is not here . . ." We know that our Lord is a Risen Saviour who cannot be limited to one locality or to one individual or group. We discover for the first time that when Jesus said, "I am with you always", He was speaking to every individual who should accept Him as Saviour down through the centuries.

You and I will probably enter the church this Easter Day. But all of the loveliness of the lilies and all of the beauty of the sacred music will fail to touch our hearts unless we have first discovered for ourselves that "He is risen"! Until each of us has met Him along life's road and taken Him to the heartstone of our lives Easter shall be an empty and meaningless day. But if He is truly our Saviour, then we shall know that all of our deepest desires and most perplexing questions are understood by Him. We shall enter into His House on Easter Day with triumphant gladness and as we break bread together at the Lord's table the one who has said to us, "Come", will be no stranger. With thanksgiving to God in our hearts the words of the hymn of dedication shall be upon our lips as we sing:

There is a green hill far away, Outside a city wall,
Where the dear Lord was crucified, Who died to save us all.
We may not know, we cannot tell, What pains he had to bear;
But we believe it was for us, He hung and suffered there.
There was not other good enough To pay the price of sin;
He only could unlock the gate of heaven, and let us in.
O dearly, dearly has He love, And we must love Him too;
And trust in His redeeming blood, And try His works to do.

Leon Gray, superintendent of the Oxford Orphanage, Oxford, N. C., presided over the meetings which included the institute "Religion in the Home" by Dr. William B. Oglesby, Jr., Department of Theology at the Union Theological Seminary in Richmond, Va., a dinner meeting with the president's address, business sessions by the conference, and a special meeting of the executives of the Homes with the Executive Director of the Child Welfare League of America, Joseph H. Reid. A special session was held for the case workers and the houseparents under the leadership of Ethel Barger, Washington, D. C., formerly director and case worker of Children's Homes in Ohio, New Mexico, and Illinois.

Attending this conference from Barium Springs were Miss Kate Taylor, supervisor, Miss Rebekah Carpenter, case worker, and A. B. McClure, superintendent.

## Old Church Building Removed From Campus

The Crouch Brothers House Movers are in the process of removing the old church building. The general condition of the structure did not warrant its being transformed into something other than a church building. It was carefully inspected by several builders and the unanimous opinion was that the only satisfactory manner for handling it was to remove it entirely. Three small windows have been preserved and will be placed in use again. Some of the Negro members of the staff have requested the pulpit and communion table for their church and this request will be granted.

As this building is dismantled, there is a general feeling of gratitude on the part of all those who behold the operation; gratitude for the fine service rendered and for the magnificent things that have happened within the walls of this building and gratitude for the lovely new church which stands at the north end of the campus and continues to be a great inspiration to all.

## Fiscal Year Closes Auditors Coming

March 31st closes another year's operation for the business office of the Home. Miss Juanita McInnis, the treasurer, and the other members of the office will be busy preparing for the auditors to review the books. No exact statement can be made concerning the income and expenditures until the auditor's report is in; however, a general summary indicates that the annual operation was without deficit and within the approved budget of the Board of Regents. Other income from the churches was about the same as for last year. The detailed report of the auditors will be placed on file in the Synod's office as soon as it has been received by the Board of Regents.

## BARIUM'S MOST VALUABLE PLAYERS, CAPTAINS ANNOUNCED AT BANQUET

Record & Landmark Sports Editor Barium Springs. — Permanent captains and selection of the most valuable players on both varsity squads highlighted the annual Barium Springs basketball banquet held here last night on the Presbyterian campus.

Following a steak dinner, featured along with fried oysters and all the trimmings, Coach Archie Calhoun announced the selections which were voted on yesterday by the varsity squads.

Shelby McEwen was named permanent captain of the girls team and a three-way tie for most valuable player between Janet Woodall, Nancy Ferrell and Nancy Kyles

was revealed by Calhoun. It was the first time in history, as far as anyone knew, that a tie for the MVP award had ever existed in Barium Springs' athletics.

Center Ernest Austin was named captain of the Tornado five and Walter "Dub" Plyler, a forward, was selected as the team's most valuable player. Austin is a senior and Plyler a junior.

Recapping the basketball season, Calhoun recalled an incident that occurred at Barium earlier in the year. A visiting coach was talking about some of the big schools in the conference that were dominating athletics. He had only 368 students in high school.

## Two Seniors Talk About Barium Springs

As a girl of twelve years coming to Barium, I was filled with mixed feelings. I was curious for I had never even visited an orphanage before. I was a little scared—of what I can't imagine—but I was positive it would be awful and that I would not like it. My preconception met with opposition from the first. The children we saw were laughing, playing, and having fun. My fright vanished.

We arrived just before dinner and at the table Miss Carpenter introduced me to Joyce Ferrell who was to be my roommate. She was friendly and helpful as were the other twenty-two girls in Rumble Hall, and I believe almost all of them crowded into our room that afternoon to get acquainted and to help me unpack and get settled. Later, we went swimming, after which I had an abundant supply of guides to take me on a tour of the campus. They really made me feel welcome.

But, I very quickly learned that life in my new home wasn't all play. Each child has a task varying according to his age. The smallest children start by learning to make their beds each morning. Later they are taught to sweep a porch or a room, to dust, and to keep their lockers neat in which they keep their toys. At a very early age everyone learns how to string and shell beans. It is not unusual to have six to eight crates to tackle at one time. However, we have learned to break the monotony with such diversions as singing, playing buzz (a game using numbers), or listening to a good jazz band over the radio.

A girl usually works in the dining room while she is in the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades. After that her jobs vary greatly. She may do almost anything from washing dishes to cooking meals, making clothes or mending them, cleaning house, helping care for the smaller children, or she may be chosen to work in the Snack Bar, as I do, although I sometimes wonder if I am not stretching the truth by calling it work.

In my leisure time I take part in many of the activities on the campus. During my sophomore year I was invited to join the Beta Club and was honored by being elected president for this year. I sing in the Church Choir and in the Glee Club, although I am skeptical as to whether either has profited by my presence. Last year it was my privilege to be asked to serve as Program Chairman on the Senior High Fellowship Council. Although I like some sports, this is just not my field. I try to play basketball, but have never made the varsity squad. This year could prove to be different since we have such a small number of girls in high school. My height does not help me as a guard,

In the fall of 1949 there came to Barium Springs three frightened children, my brother, my sister, and I. We were met at the office by Miss Carpenter and a group of boys and girls. No longer were we frightened, but we were very homesick. Because of the thoughtfulness and kindness of everyone in our cottage we soon forgot our homesickness and were once again laughing and carefree.

The building in which I lived during my first two years is called Rumble Hall. There were twenty-four girls and we were very mischievous. We worked in the dining-room where each girl had two tables to serve and clear off and dishes to wash after supper and during the summer. We had ten girls working in the dish hall and we enjoyed our work because we sang a great deal of the time. We were very fond of changing the words to many of the songs to make them fit the occasion. Of all the years that I have spent at Barium I think my two years at Rumble Hall were the happiest.

In the spring of 1951 I moved to the Woman's Building along with the other girls in my class. There we were faced with new jobs such as working in the kitchen, laundry and sewing room. Also, a few girls were chosen to keep the house in good order. These girls were called "house cats". I was somewhat tomboyish during my two years at the Woman's Building, spending a good deal of my spare time in climbing trees.

In 1953 I moved to Annie Louise Cottage where there are always two big girls to help take care of the children. We worked with girls ranging from six to ten years of age. Girls of this age are very nice to work with because they say and do so many cute things. My work again was different from what I was used to doing. After school we did our regular work, such as cleaning the second and third floors.

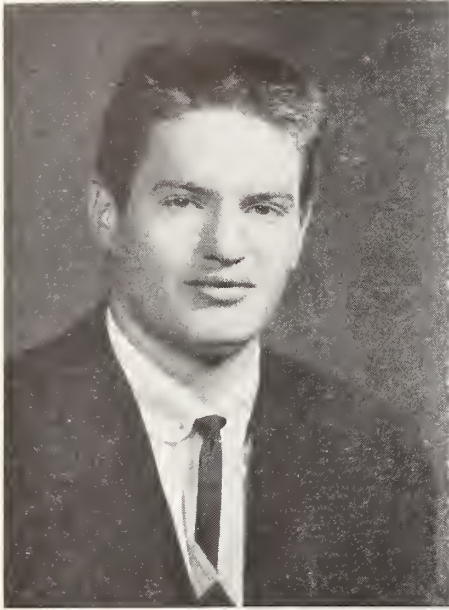
The little girls cleaned first and did an excellent job for girls of their age. I also became acquainted with scrubbing and waxing floors. We had a day set aside for mending clothes if they needed it, and they usually did. Besides working I had lots of free time in which I could do almost anything—that is if it was in reason.

After living at Annie Louise for two years, I moved back to the Woman's Building and while there worked in the kitchen during the summer, trying to learn to cook. There was only one thing wrong—we cooked in such large quantities that I would hate to fix something for a small group and it would be likely to have too much seasoning.

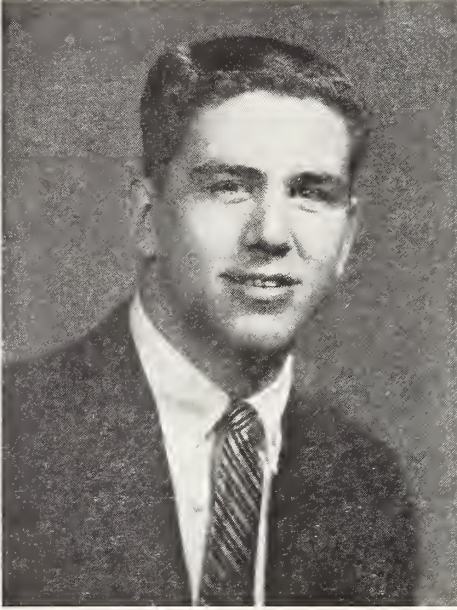
I am now a big sister. The big sister system is at present an innovation. Whenever a housemother wants to go off for some reason I take over until she comes back, or if

**UNDER THE STEEPLE – Nuggets of News**

FROM LITTLE JOE'S CHURCH

This issue of the MESSENGER will come to you at a time when graduations from high school and college are taking place. Our own Senior Class is featured in this month's paper, and all of us here at Barium Springs are particularly proud of these boys and girls who have a very special place in the hearts of the entire Barium family. As they complete their high school work and go out to assume their responsibilities in an adult world, the word "commencement" takes on a new significance. It is not just the day when the Seniors receive their high school diplomas. Instead, commencement brings to our minds its first and true meaning, that of "beginning."

I have always liked the term "commencement" when used in connection with the graduating exercises of a school. For when rightly understood, graduation is always the starting point for some greater and higher achievement in life. This applies to the realm of the mind and of the spirit, and in reality the two cannot be separated. Paul knew this and so he wrote to the Philippians (3:12ff): "Not that I have already obtained this . . . but I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus."

If it should be my privilege to speak to all who will graduate this year, I would direct them to this statement which can be summed up in the words, "The Upward Call." For Paul knew that in this life there is no such thing as final attainment. He bids his readers to "hold true to what we have attained", but reminds them that any achievement, any accomplishment, is but a plateau in the climb "toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus."

It is well that this wisdom from Philippians be remembered by all who approach the commencement hour as graduates. Such words will help us to avoid the pitfall of false complacency that sometimes causes us to say, "At last, I've arrived. This is what I've been waiting for all these years!" And lest those of us who have probably passed our last day of formal commencement long ago sit back and say, "This does not apply to me," I would add this further word. No man outgrows his need for growth, and the upward call of Christ is a call to all people of every age. So at this commencement season, those of us Under The Steeple look with gratitude and pride at our graduates who move out into a world we of an older generation have prepared for them. And as they go forward with Bible and diploma in hand we know that this is but the beginning, for them and for us.

Since this is my last year at Barium, I can look back and see that if I had not come to Barium I would not have been able to participate in as many high school activities. I realize how much I love it here and I appreciate the many privileges which I have had.

The Home has an educational fund which will help to finance my training as a nurse and I will be obligated to repay this when I begin working; with this help I am planning to enter the Presbyterian Hospital in Charlotte to prepare myself for a profession which has been my ambition since long before I was old enough to read the Sue Barton nurse books.

## Board Of Regents Meet In Regular Session

The special concern of the Board was the needs of the boys and girls and of the staff members. The Board deplores the low wage scale and is making every effort to bring the salaries of this place in line with other salaries for like work. The living quarters of the students and the needs that they have are of special concern and the Board continues to give careful attention to these needs and has made plans for the meeting of them in part in the coming year.

The students who travel by bus will be especially delighted with the proposed purchase of a new forty-passenger bus. This will mean no more breakdowns and long waits on the road for the motor to be worked on or some other vehicle to come for them.

Two of the oldest cottages which are beyond redemption will be replaced in the coming year. Funds for these replacements come from special gifts designated for this purpose.

Mr. Fred A. Long of Lenoir was elected president of the Board, Mrs. Lewis Schenck of Davidson, vice-president, and Mr. Charles Hagan, Jr., of Greensboro was re-elected secretary. Mr. W. E. Price of Charlotte, the retiring president, and Mrs. F. L. Smyre of Gastonia, the retiring vice-president, have completed their second terms on the Board and are ineligible for reelection to membership.

## Joyner And Bernardo Awarded Medals

During the commencement exercises, Ralph Joyner, a member of the senior class of 1956 received the student Ace Medal award and Hilda Bernardo of the graduating class of 1928 received the alumni Ace Medal award. The member of the senior class is chosen by vote of the student body of the high school and the members of the staff. The former graduate of the Home is chosen by a committee composed of staff members.

## NEW TRAINING PROGRAM SET UP FOR CHILDREN'S WORKERS

Chapel Hill—An "on-the-campus" training program for houseparents and others caring for youngsters in children's homes in six Southeastern states was announced today by the School of Social Work of the University of North Carolina and the Southeastern Conference of Workers in Homes for Children, joint sponsors of the project.

The program, which will get underway June 1, is the first of its kind in the country, according to Dr. Alan Keith-Lucas, associate professor of social work here. It will be supported by contributions from 19 children's institutions and by matching funds from the Duke Endowment. A three-year program has been assured.

Dr. Keith-Lucas will serve as part-time director for the program. Consultant and associate director will be Alton M. Broten, presently director of the Lutheran Children's Home in Addiston. III

The governing board of the project is composed of Dr. Keith-Lucas; Dr. Arthur E. Fink, dean of the School of Social Work; Allan R. Broome, superintendent, Epworth Home, Columbia, S. C.; Claude Corry, superintendent, Bethesda Home for Boys, Savannah, Ga.; Dr. E. F. Gettys, superintendent, John de la Howe School, McCormick, S. C.; Max Livingston, superintendent, Methodist Children's Home, Selma, Ala.; A. B. McClure, superintendent, Barium Springs Children's Home, Barium Springs; Miss Mary Bruce Roberts, superintendent, Hillside Cottages, Atlanta, Ga., secretary; Leon Smith, superintendent, Methodist Home, Richmond, Va.,

ex-officio member and president of the Southeastern Conference; and General Superintendent W. C. Reed of the Baptist General Conference of N. C. at Thomasville who is serving as chairman of the body.

"Although there are more than 100,000 children in the United States living in institutions, little attention has been paid to the training of those persons who are primarily responsible for their daily living," Chairman Reed explained. "This is the first attempt to bring such instruction to the campuses on a systematic basis, thus providing an opportunity for training to every houseparent in these 19 institutions. This is a very practical approach and those of us in the child care field are delighted that the University's School of Social Work is cooperating to strengthen this vital phase of our work."

Broten will be primarily responsible for direct service to the institutions concerned, Chairman Reed said. "We are pleased to get a leader of his experience," the Baptist superintendent said. "He has had ten years' experience in institutional work and has been associated with the training courses offered houseparents through the Welfare Council of Chicago and University of Chicago." In addition to his duties in the new training program, he will hold the position of lecturer in the School of Social Work.

Dr. Keith-Lucas has long been associated with institutional work and has taken major responsibility for the annual workshops the University sponsors for executives and houseparents of children's institutions.

To my mind one of the most worthwhile features of the Christian Education program of the church year is the Vacation Bible School. I write this article after having just visited each class in our Bible School. Not only was the quality of work very high, but the enthusiasm of both pupils and teachers indicated to me that all who participated had profited greatly. There were 120 boys and girls enrolled in Bible School this year with classes from the Kindergarten through the Junior Departments. We are grateful to the fifteen teachers and helpers for their diligent work, and to Almighty God who allows us to study His Word in freedom that we may grow in Christian maturity.

Camp time is upon us and soon large groups of our Pioneer and Senior High age young people will be leaving for Camp Grier, our Presbytery Camp at Old Fort. We also have two of our Council members who are on Presbytery's Senior High Council and they will attend a special training camp prior to the regular camp period. ## SUMMARY OF THE YEAR APRIL 1, 1955-MARCH 31, 1956

The seasons roll, the year passes, and the time comes for another report. The blessings of God have been manifest in the life of the Home and unto Him we would offer praise and thanksgiving. We would acknowledge the great Head of the Church, Jesus Christ, to be the head of this Home and earnestly hope its manner of operation this year has been to His honor and glory.

**Printing:** In January, 1956, the printer, Edwin K. Kyles, died of a heart attack. Since that time the print shop has been operated only for small items of the office and the mailing of the Messenger. The printing of the paper has been done in Statesville by the Brady Printing Company. Applications are on file for replacement but nothing has been done because of the uncertainty which exists in relationships of print shops on orphanage campuses to Interstate Commerce regulations. One shop on another campus is being investigated by the Department of Labor to the end that it may have to meet the requirements of Interstate Commerce. It would be unprofitable for us to operate under such a plan. If and when this matter can be settled the Home will proceed on the most sensible program, continuing with the print shop if possible; if not, securing the printing done outside and the mailing done by the Home. Since the shoes were repaired in the print shop by the printer, it has also been necessary to have this done in Statesville. This will be continued in the year to come.

**Farm, Dairy, Orchard, Poultry:** The farm under the direction of Mr. J. F. Stinson, produced abundantly. 6,000 bushels of small grain, the most in the history of the farm, were harvested. Approximately 3,000 bushels of corn and 170 tons of silage corn, were stored. 76 hogs were killed, making more than ten tons of meat for the table. Lespedeza seed, lespedeza hay, alfalfa hay, straw, and seed corn were other items of production. Mr. Stinson says that the general condition of the farm is as good or better than he has ever known it.

The early gardens suffered tremendously from the freeze in the spring of '55; however, the output of vegetables for the table was greatly increased, though not entirely satisfactory. Mr. Luther Thomasson, the gardener, has high hopes for this year's production and believes that the two-year experiment which is now in the second year can demonstrate the wisdom of the procedure. The growing of chickens is also under the direction of Mr. Thomasson and the year was about as satisfactory as could be expected under the present arrangement. There can never be a good job done in raising chickens until the houses are built near enough to the campus for the students, under the direction of an adult, to take care of them. This move should be made within the next twelve months and the matter of chickens and eggs should become a big item in the profit column.

The dairy is still under the direction of Mr. Arthur Hanks. It appears to all who know the facts

that this has been a good year. When the Home was forced to use processed milk, a thorough study was made of the whole matter, seeking opinions from the experts of State College, from practical operators nearby, and from the people of the County who are qualified to know the answers to questions in dairying. It was concluded that Barium Springs could best proceed in the matter of dairying by culling its herd and making good replacements in the Holstein breed. Additional cows were to be secured in order that the Home might produce sufficient milk to offset the price paid for the milk purchased. It is expected that in the year to come the dairy will be able to produce the one-third more than purchased in order to break even on the expenditures of processed milk. The beef herd is growing slowly and continues to be a real source of satisfaction as a supplement to the meat diet. There is still room for additional white-face cattle.

The orchard last year suffered an entire loss in the peach crop and produced only about 300 bushels of apples. This was almost a total fruit loss for the year. The orchard man, Mr. Woodrow Clendenin, reports 800 apple trees and 600 peach trees in good condition. This year the early cold snap got all the peaches on the young trees, but it appears now that there will be a sixty percent peach crop and a fine apple crop. Thus, we can replenish our storehouse with canned peaches, apple sauce, etc., and also have fresh fruit for the children in the summer and through the winter.

**Plant Operation and Maintenance:** In the matter of maintenance it is hoped that progress is being made. At times, however, it seems that only the emergencies are being met. In the year just closed the Lottie Walker Building, the Elementary School Building, the Grier home, the Calhoun house, the Quads (Johnston, Wallace, Stultz, and Cannon) received special attention in the way of painting, repairs, and replacement. It is doubtful that many of the buildings can ever be restored and, therefore, the only satisfactory solution is their removal and replacement with new one-story fire-proof buildings. The two cottages now housing small boys and small girls, just north and south of Rumble Hall, will be replaced in the near future.

The farm and dairy buildings are in a very poor state of repair. This is not new as this condition prevailed in 1950 and, I am sure, many years prior to that.

**Case Work:** The Case Work Department is understaffed and, therefore, overworked. It is generally recommended that there be one case worker for every fifty children in a Home. Our case work is handled by Miss Rebekah Carpenter. She finds herself more than busy as she deals with the children to be admitted and the ones who are already in the Home. Our enrollment shows that there are now 95 girls and 128 boys, making a total of 223 children in the Home. It is interesting to note that of this number 9 are full orphans; 52 having living

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fathers; 46 have living mothers; 116 have both parents living. This is about typical of all other homes. During the year April 1, 1955 to March 31, 1956, 39 children were admitted.

**Christian Education:** The worship services in the new Church continue to be a great source of inspiration. With the commencement exercises this year, we feel that the Church has reached full fruition in its services. Not only have the regular services of worship been held, but there have been funeral services, one wedding, church members received, infants baptized, and now the commencement services held in it. All who have seen it have expressed gratitude to God for its loveliness and for what it does to the campus day and night in its witness of Him. The Church School and cottage instruction and religious programs for all ages have been the regular part of the life of the Home. The new year holds out hope for additional accomplishments through the duly established processes, plus additional training that may be offered through the Elementary School in religious instruction. There seems to be an entirely harmonious procedure in the life of the Home and Church in this important business of nurturing children in the things of God.

**Education:** The school on the campus operated successfully. Mr. R. G. Calhoun, the principal, and his fifteen teachers have carried on the regular academic program and the extra-curricular activities, such as athletics, Beta Club, etc. The announcement of the proposed change in removing the high school to Troutman has been well received. No former student or interested person in the Home has expressed anything but pleasure in this prospect for the children in going to the Troutman School. The children of the Home, while expressing some anxiety about the new venture, look with some real satisfaction toward the enlarged life that will be theirs. Mr. S. H. Helton, Superintendent of the Iredell County Schools, has accepted the ninth and tenth grades at Troutman for next year. The eleventh and twelfth grades will remain at Barium Springs. Possibly, during the year the new school building in process there will be completed and the change may be effected in its entirety in the fall of 1957. If not, it will be completed

in the fall of 1958. The removal of the high school to Troutman will offer more space for the Elementary School and with the additional required equipment, the Elementary School can become accredited.

In the coming year it is proposed to continue the varsity sports program under the direction of the Home in the same manner that we have been doing through the high school; however, the small number of students makes it appear that football in the Home's program as a varsity sport may of necessity have to be discontinued in the near future. That bridge can be crossed when it is reached.

**Health:** The Health program is good. Doctors Lafferty and McLaughlin in their general physical examination in January expressed great satisfaction in the care afforded the children. The infirmary on the campus, Dr. Bonner on call in Troutman, and the full services of Davis Hospital afford the boys and girls of the Home excellent care in the time of illness. The dental program, under the direction of the committee and carried out by Dr. Smith Kirk, is an excellent piece of work. The children are getting expert care. It is anticipated that in the new year the services of Dr. Davenport of Hickory will be secured for orthodontia, and that the children who need to have their teeth adjusted or straightened can receive this service also.

A new feature has come into the Health Program. Dr. Alanson Hinman of the Department of Pediatrics in the Bowman Gray School of Medicine in Winston-Salem is initiating a program of Child Guidance. He and his assistant are at present visiting the campus every two weeks. Through this process students who need his services are given proper scientific guidance. Dr. Hinman is a member of the First Presbyterian Church in Winston-Salem and his services will cost us little, but it is agreed that a necessary amount should be placed in the budget in order to carry this program if and when someone else succeeds him.

It can be said that one of the reasons for good health is the good food. The dining room and kitchen and total campus now rate Grade A. Of this we are very proud and for this we are very grateful. In the new year even more attention can be given to the meals, particularly enlarging on the first meal of the day (breakfast) for the older boys and girls.

**Finances:** The operation of the Home for the year 1955-1956 has been within the approved budget of the Board of Regents. The superintendent has requested the members of the Board to be exceedingly diligent in thoroughly informing themselves as to the Home's operation and as to the wisdom of the procedures that are taken. The advice and counsel of the Finance Committee has been sought and also that of every member of the Board in working out a salary scale adequate for services rendered and in keeping with the standards of the day.

It has been the conviction of all those connected with the Home that the Presbyterians of the Synod of North Carolina will meet any need that exists on the campus if they can be assured that the money is expended wisely. Let it be said again this year that The Board will give attention to the needs of the Home and so interpret them to the Synod and the Stewardship Committee as to receive due consideration in the apportioning of funds from the Benevolence Budget.

**Conclusion:** The year just closed has offered greater satisfaction in the work than any of the preceding five. The response of the staff and of the students in the program of the Home has been gratifying. The splendid service rendered by the members of the staff is a thing of which the Synod of North Carolina can be proud. Their willingness to toil long hours with inadequate equipment characterizes the high quality of their devotion. A new generation of students makes it possible to alter old procedures without too much friction and to gain a cooperative effort from the student body. The changes in housing, the changes in school procedure and other plans yet to be put into effect give real hope for continued good work in the Home.

## President Of Board Reports To Synod

Mr. W. E. Price, the retiring president of the Board of Regents, made the annual report to the Synod of North Carolina. The text of this report follows in the remaining paragraphs.

### 1. Presbyterian Orphans' Home

W. E. Price, President  
Board of Regents

The blessings of God have been manifest in the life of the Home. We would acknowledge His goodness and express our gratitude for His loving kindness and provision for the needs of His children. The Regents have met in regular session twice during the year that has just closed. This governing body sets forth the policies and reviews the procedures of the total operation. The members of the Board have been faithful in their attendance and earnest in their desire to fulfill the duties incumbent upon them. As a member of the Board for the last eight years and president for the last five of these eight, and having seen the turmoil of transition, it is with great pleasure that I note the absence of friction and the presence of harmonious effort on the part of the total staff to accomplish the good for the boys and girls.

only in the field of dentistry, but in his association with the boys and girls.

The Synod will take note of the change in the school arrangements of the Home. Formerly, we have had what is technically a County School. The State has afforded the number of teachers necessary for the number of students at Barium on the basis of the State teacher load. Having smaller classes, it meant that the Home had to supplement the number of teachers at its own expense. After careful study of the needs of the children, the Board voted unanimously to integrate the high school with the Troutman high school, one and one-half miles south, thus affording the children the opportunity of a normal community high school experience

which will better fit them to leave the Home and join society. This will be begun in the fall of 1956 and will be completed in the fall of 1957. This move is in line with the common practice of child-caring institutions over the Southland.

The Home was operated in the year just closed without deficit. The books have been carefully audited by a professional firm and the report of this firm is on file in the Synod's office. Fifteen thousand dollars was added to the Endowment Fund from the J. T. Montgomery estate by direction of his will, and other Capital gifts during the year will suffice for the building of one of the new cottages so sorely needed.

The Regents are making every effort to bring the physical plant into good shape. It is a fact that the buildings are old and many of the farm buildings are beyond repair and will have to be replaced. It is the hope of the Regents that the special gifts of the Home will enable the Board to do the necessary repairs and replacements without having to make a special appeal to the Synod of North Carolina.

The Presbyterian Orphans' Home is equipped to take care of 250 children. At the close of the year there were 225 children in the Home. The applications during the year for boys far exceeded the space available, while applications for girls was rather low and left some vacancies in the girls' buildings.

The Board of Regents will be glad to receive from the members of the Synod any inquiries concerning the operation of the Home and to make available to any person full information about this part of the Synod's work. An invitation is extended to any person who wishes

to visit the place to come by and see the boys and girls and to get first-hand information about the kind of work the Presbyterian Church is trying to do for the children at Barium Springs.

Since I am retiring from the Board at this meeting of Synod, may I express my appreciation to Synod for assigning me eight years of service on the Board. Also I want to express my high regard for Mr. McClure, our Superintendent, for the mutual spirit of cooperation, understanding and helpfulness in working out the difficult problems which presented themselves in the operation of the home.

# UNDER THE STEEPLE - Nuggets of News

FROM LITTLE JOE'S CHURCH

Most of us enjoy surprises and when I returned from my vacation at the end of July a good one awaited me. The president of our Senior High Fellowship told me that plans were underway to have a "Back to School with Christ" Rally for our community. Six youth groups from the churches in the vicinity of Troutman and Barium Springs wanted to sponsor it with the idea of emphasizing the importance of one's Christian faith in school, as well as in all other walks of life. "What do you think of it?", my council leader wanted to know. ## FISCAL YEAR WILL END SEPTEMBER 30

Therefore, the fiscal year of The Presbyterian Orphans' Home at Barium Springs will begin October 1st, 1956, and end September 30th, 1957, thus effecting a more satisfactory and economical pattern of operation for the Home's business office.

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## THIRTY YEAR REVIEW

(From the Duke Endowment Yearbook)

The thirtieth consecutive year of service to the child caring institutions in the Carolinas was completed at the close of the calendar year 1954. It is felt that a brief review of the work of the Orphan Section of The Duke Endowment and of the assisted institutions during this thirty year period will be interesting and proper at this time.

The terms of the Trust Indenture establishing The Duke Endowment which was signed by James B. Duke on December 11, 1924 state that the orphanages and child caring institutions in the two Carolinas were to receive ten per cent of the income from this fund for the care of orphan and half orphan children, without respect to race or creed. The Trust Indenture directs the Trustees in the administration of this fund to assist properly operated institutions that are not operated for private gain and a liberal interpretation of the term "properly operated" has been given inasmuch as practically every child caring institution in the Carolinas has been assisted. It is felt that this policy has been a sound one as it has enabled a few institutions with low standards the additional financial assistance with which to raise their standards. Also, the support by the Trustees of The Duke Endowment has encouraged other outside assistance to the institutions and this assistance has stimulated improvements in the standard of service throughout the years.

The Trustees of The Duke Endowment in the beginning of this week assisted the child caring institutions in the care of orphan and half orphan children actually in residence in institutions. In recent years, however, since 1944 assistance has been given for orphan and half orphan children cared for in foster homes under institution supervision on the same basis as children in institutions. Furthermore, in 1947 through 1949 the Trustees encouraged this type of care by assisting three institutions — Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina, Thomasville, North Carolina; Presbyterian Orphans' Home, Barium Springs, North Carolina; and Connie Maxwell Children's Home, Greenwood, South Carolina—in a special way to extend this type

of service to children. The program was set up to subsidize case work service at each of these three institutions on a three-year basis, with The Duke Endowment's contribution being on a withdrawing basis.

At the Children's Home Society of North Carolina, Greensboro, North Carolina, the Trustees of The Duke Endowment have another significant experiment under way and are subsidizing, at the request of the Directors of the Children's Home Society, a special program which places for adoption older orphan and half orphan children now in institutions in North Carolina. This program began in 1950 and was for a three-year period but at the end of the original period it was learned that sufficient time for the development of the program had not been allowed and assistance has been extended on a year to year basis since that time. During the four years since the beginning of this program and to the end of 1954 a total of 42 older children have been placed for adoption from North Carolina institutions by this organization and of this number 17 were orphan or half orphan. Of the total children placed, 17 have been legally adopted. In addition to those placed in adoptive homes, 13 children were removed from institutions and returned to relatives through this program.

The information shown below indicates comparisons for 1925 and 1954 unless otherwise indicated. However, some of the information was not obtained for 1925 and in that case the figures for 1926 or other valuable years have been used.

**Institutions Assisted** in 1925 numbered 39 of which 26 were in North Carolina and 13 in South Carolina. Thirty-nine institutions were assisted in 1954, including 27 in North Carolina and 12 in South Carolina. Of the original 39 assisted institutions in 1925, 30 were still in operation and assisted in 1954. Fourteen institutions have closed, one still in operation did not apply in 1954, and 15 opened during the thirty year period, 1925-1954 inclusive. As will be seen, the number of institutions assisted remains the same as in 1925. In the year 1935, 47 institutions were assisted, which was the largest number assisted in any one year during the period.

**Bed Capacity** at 39 institutions on December 31, 1925 was 5,799. There

were 5,572 beds in 39 institutions on December 31, 1954, indicating a decrease of 227 beds or 3.9 per cent for the thirty year period. It is interesting to note that there has been little variation in the bed occupancy of the assisted institutions during the period—87.0 per cent occupancy in 1925 and 85.0 per cent in 1954.

**Children Cared for** in 39 assisted institutions in 1925 totaled 5,983, with 4,767 or 79.7 per cent being either orphan or half orphan children. In 1954 there were 5,947 children cared for in the 39 assisted institutions and of this number 3,185 or 53.6 per cent were either orphan or half orphan. The ratio of children cared for to population was one to 759 in 1925 and one to 1,091 in 1954.

**Admissions** numbered 994 in 39 institutions in 1925. There were 1,211 admissions in 39 institutions in 1954 which represented an increase of 21.8 per cent in the number of admissions in 1954 as compared with 1925. The ratio of admissions to population was one to 4,565 in 1925 and one to 5,358 in 1954.

**Discharges** numbered 878 in 1925 and there were 5,075 children in the 39 assisted institutions on December 31, 1925. The number of discharges in 1954 was 1,219 and on December 31, 1954 there were 4,728 children in the 39 institutions. The ratio of discharges to population was one to 5,168 in 1925 and one to 5,322 in 1954. It is noted that the number of discharges in 1954 was 38.8 per cent more than the number of discharges in 1925.

**Days of Care.** A total of 58,119,075 days of care to needy children was given by the assisted institutions during the thirty year period which was an average of 1,937,303 days each year. The days of care totaled 1,841,111 at 39 assisted institutions in 1925, with the days of orphan and half orphan children amounting to 1,640,184 or 89.0 per cent of the total days of care. The days of care of children with both parents living in 1925 numbered 200,927 and made up only 11.0 per cent of the total. There were 1,720,128 days of care rendered by 39 institutions in 1954 with 970,922 days or 56.4 per cent being for orphan and half orphan children, and 749,206 days or 43.6 per cent for children with both parents living. The most significant change noted in the work of the child caring institutions is the increase in the days of care rendered children with both parents living,

from 11.0 per cent of the total in 1925 to 43.6 per cent in 1954. There was a decrease of 6.6 per cent in the total days of care in 1954 as compared with 1925.

**Employees** at 41 institutions in 1926 numbered 748 and provided an average of one employee for 6.9 children based on the average number of children per day. There were 998 persons employed in 1954 in 39 institutions, giving an average of one employee to 5.0 children for the year.

**Schools.** A total of 5,963 children were enrolled during the 1933-34 school term in schools, of which total 1,639 or 27.5 per cent attended public schools away from the institutions and 4,324 or 72.5 per cent were in schools maintained at the institutions. During the 1953-54 school term a total of 4,893 children were enrolled and 2,266 or 46.3 per cent of them were in public schools away from the institutions and 2,627 or 53.7 per cent in schools maintained at the institutions. The enrollment in public schools of children from institutions has increased 38.3 per cent during the period covered.

**Mothers' Aid and Foster Home Care.** In 1926 at five institutions a total of 110 mothers and 483 children were assisted in mothers' aid programs. Two institutions assisted 38 mothers and 113 children in 1954 in such programs. There were 337 children cared for in 1926 in foster care programs under the direct or indirect supervision of six institutions. Four institutions in 1954 were providing direct service to 182 children in foster homes with the Trustees of The Duke Endowment providing assistance for 16,578 days of care of orphan and half orphan children in such homes on the same basis as for care in institutions. Since 1944, the year in which the Trustees of The Duke Endowment started assisting institutions with the care of orphan and half orphan children in foster homes, assistance has been provided for a total of 172,537 days of care of orphan and half orphan children in foster homes under institution supervision.

A total of 11,172 acres of land were owned by the 41 assisted institutions in 1926. In 1954 the 39 institutions owned 17,001 acres of land, which was an increase of 5,829 acres or 52.2 per cent. In 1926 there were a total of 2,534 acres or 23.0 per cent under cultivation; in 1954, 5,208 acres or 30.6 per cent were under cultivation.

## BARIUM TRAINING AIDED CHARLES IN SHOP-SCHOOL LIFE

A 1952 Barium Springs graduate, Charles Stevens, now 23 years old, is in many ways like any other young man of his age who has been spending the summer at Virginia Beach. But he's unlike most young men his age in one respect—he hasn't been swimming all summer. "I haven't had time", Charlie explains.

His colleagues in Statesville say he always was a busy and thrifty lad while growing up at the local church home. They take it as a matter of course that every morning from 7 to 9 o'clock he's at the College of William and Mary in Norfolk, studying industrial management and Spanish. Afterwards, he hurries back to Virginia Beach to open his Mexican Shop on Atlantic Avenue between 23rd and 24th Streets. He usually stays open until 10 p. m.—and on Sundays as well.

The Virginian-Pilot newspaper of Norfolk-Portsmouth, Va., has taken note of Charles' shop and in describing the carrot-topped young man states that customers who come in to look at his imported handiercraft find him a pleasant, brown-eyed young man with a friendly, dignified manner.

Keeping busy isn't new for Charles. After high school, he had two years in the armed forces. After that came college. This fall, he has entered his junior year at the University of North Carolina.

### Young Man On Own

Charles is a young man with a purpose—and a young man on his own. When he was two years old, his mother died. His father, a small farmer, sent Charles and his sister, who was nine, to the Presbyterian Children' Home at Barium Springs, a few miles south of Statesville.

"It's the only home I've ever had," said Charles. "I'm just as close to it as ever." When four younger boys came from the same orphanage to the beach this summer, he took time off from his shop to help show them a good time.

He has another friend at the beach from the same environment. "His name is Carl Spicer. He's attending Carolina, was in the service, too; he was in my high school

class at Barium Springs. He's had the same deal I had."

Charles stopped to make change for a woman who had just bought an embroidered, beruffled hand-made treader shirt.

### "Most Fortunate Kids"

"We were the most fortunate kids in the world," he said.

"We had training and discipline, everything but parental love. We had 300 brothers and sisters. How many kids have got that much? We played football and basketball against all the other schools in the state. We learned to play together, work together, live together.

"That's what I don't think most kids have. I found that out in the service. They had to learn to adjust themselves. It isn't easy to live with a lot of other types of people."

If Charles got a lot out of his orphanage experience, he got a lot out of being in the Army, too. He was in Japan from 1952 to 1954.

"I never would have had any desire to keep on with school if it hadn't been for the service. I saw how far the college graduate, the man with an education, could go in the service—and in life. The person who didn't have it would always be stopped.

"When I got out of high school, I had thought that was enough. But everything I saw, all my experiences, my travels, showed me there was more to life than just earning a living and raising a family. I learned you really never have enough education, and that college is the quickest way to gain it and really get on a level with other people—the people you have to associate with, and want to associate with. You want to find your place in the world—a good place."

All through the years, Charles' older sister has helped him. Six years ago, she started her own Mexican shop in Georgetown, near Washington, D. C. "It's a big thing now, with all these imported hand-made things—clothes, jewelry, baskets, handloomed rugs, bric-a-brac, everything, and all Mexican. This is really a branch of her place. I couldn't have done it without her."

## Five Hundred Men Attend Concord Rally

Despite the pouring rain brought in by "Flossy," five hundred men attended the annual Fall Rally for Concord Presbytery held at Barium Springs on Tuesday evening, September 25th.

Sixty gallons of apple cider had been prepared as an appetizer for the 1250 pounds of meat that had been barbecued for the occasion. The whole Barium family had been organized for the occasion. The men and boys were over the campus, parking cars. Twenty extra tables had been put in the big dining room, and the women and girls had been assigned their stations in the kitchen and dining room for the purposes of serving. Mrs. Marshall, the dietitian, and her kitchen force had everything in readiness and at 5:30 the line began. The men continued in procession until 7:15 when the last one was served.

After the supper, they met for the evening session in Little Joe's Church. Judge Malcolm B. Seawell of Lumberton was the featured speaker. His address, "Operation Fun," was in the form of a report to stockholders of a church group who are in the business of sending children to camp. This act of applying Christian love in the community is to combat juvenile delinquency problems.

Fielding Clark of Conover was re-elected president of the organization. Other officers re-elected were vice-presidents, Edgar Reading of Concord; George C. Robbins of Lenoir; C. S. Kiser of Brookford. Bob Mashy, of Hickory, was elected secretary-treasurer to replace William D. Brown, also of Hickory.

New vice-presidents included Harold Mitchel of Valdese; R. G. Lytle of Mooresville; A. J. Gillespie, Jr., of Salisbury, and Harry W. Hasskamp of Marion.

In installing the new officers, the Reverend Robert R. Collins, local pastor, challenged the men to keep informed, be inspired and keep in touch with God.

Fred H. Brown, of Lenoir, gave a report on the Every Church Canvass for 1956.

R. D. Grier, of Statesville, was lauded as a person "who contributes most to the Presbytery," before he reported on the Development Committee. Grier explained that his group was formed three years ago to purchase land in rapidly developing areas where future churches can be built. Following his report, the only motion of the meeting was passed. It called for each club to subscribe \$1.00 per member for the next three years to the development program.

R. G. Calhoun called the roll which was answered by 44 of the 77 churches in the Presbytery.

## BARIUM SCHOOL— "A Workshop For Child Growth and Development"

Any school, to serve its purpose, must enable an individual to live his life to the fullest degree of satisfaction. This degree of satisfaction is brought about through a great appreciation for literature, music, art, religion, the ability to live with others, and to earn a living that will contribute something to the society in which he lives. It is also the responsibility of the school to develop initiative, self-expression, cooperation, tolerance, and respect for authority. In our Barium School we feel that we have been able to give each child more individual attention than would be possible in classes that are so overcrowded. It is our policy to study each child's needs, weaknesses and strengths, and to try to give him that feeling of confidence and security which will help him to grow and develop to his maximum capacity. We, as teachers, have tried to avoid swinging the pendulum to the extreme in any of the more modern methods of teaching or to the old obsolete methods of teaching. We feel that we have been able to obtain some degree of success in our methods. In recent years our classes have compared very favorably with other county schools in State-wide tests. Many children have been able to further their education, receiving degrees from some of our best colleges, and a large percentage of those who have gone directly from our school into their chosen fields of work have proven their ability to hold their own with the world in their respective communities.

Physically, no average school is prepared to give the physical training which our school affords. Being a small school, it is not the most

child who receives physical training, but even the weakest child is given an opportunity but is encouraged to share in our physical education program. Time after time, we have seen weaklings develop into healthy, well co-ordinated individuals. This training begins even in the first grade. Our physical education set-up is a well-rounded program. It includes games of every type, including those that help a child socially, such as folk dancing. This well-rounded program continues from the first grade through the twelfth grade.

We have a corps of teachers who are concerned with the spiritual growth and development of each child. In addition to the devotional programs held in schools each day, the teachers are alert to give training in honesty, fair play, and reverence toward sacred things at every opportunity during the day.

Socially and culturally, we are striving to give our children a deeper sense of confidence and more knowledge of the acceptable rules of conduct as they take their place in society. Our athletic program brings our children in contact with young people from all over the State. Through our Beta Club some of our most talented students come in contact with the most capable of students from other schools in the State. Our Public School Music teacher takes groups of children to give programs in other places. Through these social contacts many friendships are formed that may last through a lifetime. Our children play host to visitors on the campus throughout the year. These visitors are mainly those who are interested in the finer things of life. Through these social contacts our children receive training that compares favorably with that received in most communities. Even

# UNDER THE STEEPLE - Nuggets of News

FROM LITTLE JOE'S CHURCH

REV. ROBERT R. COLLINS, *Minister*

"I thank my God in all my remembrance of you . . . " (Philippians 1:3) These words written by the apostle Paul to his Christian friends at Philippi form one of the greatest compliments recorded in Scripture. Recently, while re-studying this letter of Paul, I suddenly realized the importance of this phrase. And I wondered if Paul had been writing to me instead of those friends in Philippi, could he . . . would he, have said the same thing? If he had been writing to you from the prison in Rome where he awaited the sentence of death, would he have started with these words, "I thank my God in all my remembrance of you . . . "?

It seems to me that this salutation indicates several things, about both Paul and his friends. First, it would say that their friendship was based on mutual gratitude. In Paul these people had found someone who was concerned about them. Because he had brought them the good news of Jesus Christ, the Philippians did not forget Paul. When they learned that he was in prison they sent one of their number to show their friendship, and by Epaphroditus they also sent a gift to supply Paul's needs. So, on both sides of the friendship there was a common feeling of thankfulness to God for having brought them together.

There is a second thing indicated in Paul's words. When Paul remembered his friends he said he made his prayer "with joy." This was because his Philippian friends shared a partnership with him in spreading the gospel. And to Paul this meant far more than any material gifts that could be sent to him. So, as he remembered them there was both a deep feeling of gratitude and an abiding sense of joy in the heart of Paul. It was for these reasons that Paul could declare, "I thank my God in all my remembrance of you . . . "

Here, Under the Steeple, we are a Christian community similar to the one Paul wrote to in Philippi. Who hope, that as you think of us, your remembrances are ones for which you can thank God. Surely, as we remember you, our many friends across the Synod of North Carolina, our hearts are filled with gratitude and joy. For you have made it possible for the gospel to be brought to this place which is our Home. You have come, as did Epaphroditus, and you have brought and sent gifts to supply our needs. We can say with all sincerity that we do thank God with joy as we remember you. And as we approach this season of Thanksgiving we trust that each of you can, as you think of us, utter Paul's prayer of thanksgiving: "I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, thankful for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now." Indeed, we have much for which to offer thanks for we are partners in bringing that gospel to His little children.

## REGENTS TO MEET IN FALL SESSION

The Regents of the Presbyterian Orphans' Home will meet in their regular Fall session at Barium Springs on November 8th. This is one month later than the accustomed meeting and has been necessitated by the change of the fiscal year. September 30th closed the fiscal year for the first time and the auditors will have a report on the six months elapsed since the last audit. The new fiscal year, beginning October 1st, will run until September 30, 1957.

The new members attending the Board will be Mrs. W. W. McGinn from Mecklenburg Presbytery, Mrs. David C. Clark from Granville Presbytery, Mr. R. L. Corbett from Albemarle Presbytery, and Mr. George Stovall from Mecklenburg Presbytery. President Fred A. Long of Lenoir will be presiding for the first time as the new president of the Board, succeeding Mr. W. E. Price who retired from membership in the board by reason of having served two terms.

The Board will be concerning itself with the over-all operation of the Home, giving particular attention to the necessity of renovating and equipping both laundry and the sewing room. The building housing these two operations will have to be repaired. The equipment in these buildings was second-hand thirty-four years ago and is now almost completely worn out. The Board will hope to make plans for the dedication of the new Church if it seems that the way be clear by reason of the memorials removing the remainder of the debt.

Of particular interest will be the report of the Committee on Education and Religion, of which Dr. Joe Carter is chairman, and also the report of the Buildings and Grounds Committee of which Mr. Ennis Jackson is chairman.

The Board is made up of twenty Regents, ten men and ten women. There is one woman elected by the Synod to represent each Presbytery and one man elected by the Synod to represent each Presbytery, and one man and one woman elected at large. The vice-president of the Board is Mrs. Lewis B. Schenck of Concord Presbytery, and the secretary is Charles T. Hagan from Orange Presbytery.

# Barium Springs Sidetracks Railroaders By 21-6

SLOAN FIELD, Barium Springs—An alert defense that recovered a pair of Spencer fumbles and grabbed one pass out of the air for three touchdowns sparked Barium Springs' Tornados to a 21-6 victory over the Railroaders here yesterday afternoon as alumni filled the Presbyterian campus for the homecoming game.

The victory brought R. G. Calhoun's lads to their first win this season and evened their North Piedmont Conference record at 1-1. Spencer dropped their fourth straight game in the meeting.

The lightweight Tornados looked good offensively and were baffled in the final half by Spencer's spread formation for a passing attack. But otherwise, they were outweighed but not outplayed.

Barium struck early in the game, pushing over a TD in the opening period with 40 seconds left in the first quarter. End Sidney Morrison cracked through the Spencer defense to recover Sammy Miller's fumble on the Railroaders 17 to set up the first Presbyterian TD. Lawton Rice hit Walter "Dub" Plyler on a beautiful pass play from 12-yards out for the score and Ronnie Hudgins kicked the first of three straight conversions for a 7-0 Tornado lead.

Another Spencer fumble set up the second Barium score. Spencer had driven to the Tornado seven before the Presbyterians repelled the attack as Don Sebastian, Railroader quarterback, fumbled and Peyton Miller recovered for Barium on the seven.

On the first play from scrimmage, Rice took the snap from center LeNair Burns, handed off to Fullback Charles Ward and Ward speed through a tremendous hole over left tackle, cut to the outside as Miller threw a key block and ran down the sidelines for 93 yards and the TD. Hudgins' conversion again split the uprights for a 14-0 lead.

Spencer came back on a 56-yard drive into Barium territory only to have Walter Plyler pull a Sebastian aerial intended for Dale Lanning out of the skies on the Barium two to end a serious threat as the first half ended.

Neither team drove deep into scoring territory in the third period as Spencer's Larry Jacobs and Barium's Lawton Rice waged a punting duel amid Spencer's passing efforts from a spread formation that caught the Barium secondary flat-footed several times.

A Barium fumble early in the fourth period set up Spencer's only score as Dale Lanning came up with the pigskin on the Tornado 28. Sebastian passed to Sammy Miller for 18 yards and a first down on the 10 and then hit Lanny Ryan with a 10-yard toss for the score. Jim Kiser broke through to block Bill Poole's attempted conversion.

Barium drove to the Spencer 19 before being forced to punt and Spencer drove back to Barium's 36 where Plyler intercepted another pass to stall a Railroader bid. Barium failed to move the ball and Rice lifted a 50-yard punt to Sebastian to set the Railroaders back deep in their own territory.

Sebastian, attempting to pass out of the hole, provided the finishing touch to Spencer's downfall. Cutting loose an aerial intended for Ronnie Snider, Sebastian saw Lawton Rice race in and take the ball from Snider's fingertips and race down the sidelines for 17 yards with the intercepted aerial for the final Barium score. Hudgins' educated toe again found the mark well for the final 21-6 tally.

Defensively, Richard Blackburn, Sidney Morrison, Wayne Wright, Donald Frazier, Jim Blake, Jim Kiser, Peyton Miller, Randy Shaw and LeNair Burns sparked Barium's line play while Hudgins and Plyler made a lot of tackles in the secondary.

Euds Dale Lanning and Larry Jacobs were outstanding for Spencer.

## New Cottages Will Get Paved Walks

The boys and girls of the new cottages will be delighted to have the walkways from their buildings to the dining room and to the road hard-surfaced so that they can keep their feet out of the mud. When the buildings were erected it was deemed wise to wait awhile to see just which way the children would walk as they came and went to the various places from their cottages. These paths have been pretty clearly defined and now they will be surfaced with a plant-mix treatment that will keep the feet of the children dry and clean.

Also, there will be the addition to the church property of a top dressing for the drive-in to the church. The Tar Heel Construction Company of Statesville has submitted its bids and they have been approved and the work will be finished in the immediate future.

One of the greatest blessings that has come to the campus is the laying of hard-surfaced roads through the campus and topping the walks with a dressing that keeps the feet out of the mud and eliminates the dust and dirt of the road so that the campus can be clean, and coming and going during wet weather is not so miserable. # UNDER THE STEEPLE - Nuggets of News

FROM LITTLE JOE'S CHURCH

In recent weeks at our Wednesday night prayer service we have been studying the book of Deuteronomy. We have discovered that this book is a rich mine of spiritual truths that have often been forgotten or overlooked. As I have thought about the Thanksgiving Season two verses from the eighth chapter of this great book have come to my mind. They are a part of the warning which Moses gave to the children of Israel as they prepared to enter the Promised Land. Listen, as he speaks: "Beware lest you say in your heart, 'My power and the might of my hand have gotten me this wealth.' You shall remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you power to get wealth." (Deut. 8:17, 18)

These words seem to carry a significant message to the Christians of America at Thanksgiving time. As Moses reminded his people, so he would remind us that it was the guiding hand of God which led our Pilgrim fathers to the shores of America. It is easy for us to forget this and assume that the discovery of America was mostly adventurous and accidental. But as we recall the first Thanksgiving Day in 1621 we will remember that gratitude was offered to God for his providential guidance and care. Not the ingenuity of man but the strength and wisdom of a loving Father was responsible for the establishment of this free land where all may worship God without fear.

Another matter which it is well for us to remember is that the wealth of our land was and is the gift of God. Hear the words of Moses, "You shall remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you power to get wealth." In these times most of us have more material goods and wealth than we have ever had before. Hence, there is a tendency to say, "I have earned this, it is mine!" But the Bible stands as a constant reminder that even the power to get wealth, to earn money, is the gift of God. It is therefore altogether necessary that we acknowledge Him as the source of all that we have and offer to Him our prayers of Thanksgiving.

I hope that the Presbyterians of the Synod of North Carolina will engage in such prayer on Thanksgiving Day. Under The Steeple we shall have a special service of worship on Thanksgiving morning, and we shall thank God for the wealth of blessings He has bestowed upon us here at Barium Springs. We shall remember that these gifts have been made possible through your generosity and as we make our offerings it will be with a real sense of Thanksgiving. And we shall not forget that it is through the power of the Lord our God that each of these gifts has come to us. May you find new joy in your heart this Thanksgiving as you make it possible for our family to come to Christ who said, "Let the children come to me, do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of God."

# TWO SENIORS SPEAK:

MY LIFE AT BARIUM

Late one September afternoon a car arrived from down in the eastern part of the State and deposited a little seven-year old girl, a brother, and two younger sisters at Barium Springs. We spent our first night down at the infirmary wishing very much to be back home in our own beds. But this is only one of my recollections as I look back on my life at Barium. I was soon moved over to Annie Louise Cottage where I learned to sweep the front porch which looked enormous to me at that time. To look at it now you would think that it had shrunk considerably. Along with the work, we had a lot of fun playing. Who could fail to be content with twenty-four playmates?

Three years later I was moved to Howard Cottage. At that time our main job was to string beans and to keep the house clean. Rumble Hall is a cottage I like to remember because of all the fun we had over there. Now that we had grown older, we were expected to do more work, such as working in the dining room, washing dishes, setting tables, cleaning up after the meals, and serving the food.

A year later I was chosen with another girl about my age to move to the Baby Cottage to help take care of the small children under six years old. I enjoyed this work very much. We were kept busy during the day trying to keep up with the little children and taking care of them, but the thing we liked best about the job was that our evenings were free, as the children went to bed early, and we had a chance to do some of the things we liked to do. Two years later came the experience which I had looked forward to—moving over to the Women's Building where there were about twenty-four girls of my own age. Every month we were assigned a different job such as working in the sewing room, kitchen, laundry, or taking care of the dormitory. These were all new experiences to me and ones which I thoroughly enjoyed because I was among girls of my own age. About a year ago two new cottages were built on our campus. They are different from most of our older buildings which were two or three stories high. The new buildings are all on the ground floor and are more home-like. One of these buildings is Sanford Cottage where I now live. We have girls of mixed ages from pre-school children to seniors in high school.

I am one of the seniors this year. I have the duty of helping take care of the children at our cottage when the house-

In July, 1953, my seven brothers and sisters and I, the largest group from one family ever to enter the Home, came to Barium Springs. One thing bothered me a little right at first: how was I going to fit into this group? This was a different world compared to the one I came from. I felt as if all hope for a happy life was lost.

But, I soon found that I did not have to be homesick or to feel sorry for myself — not with all the things I had to do: a regular job with the orchard group, and such recreational activities as swimming, skating, and various kinds of ball in association with my many new and interesting friends.

When I came to Barium I was assigned to the Quads where the high school boys lived. The campus was too big and overwhelming for me. I couldn't seem to remember which building my room was in, or where the dining-hall was, so instead of taking a chance on getting lost, I spent most of my leisure time following my roommate everywhere he went and doing everything he did until I knew my way around the campus.

At Barium Springs everyone has a job to do. My jobs have been spraying the trees, picking apples and peaches, canning the fruit and vegetables, grading apples, and putting them in cold storage, and keeping the orchard and the orchard equipment in good shape. Except for working on the house cleaning group for three months, I did this orchard work for three years, from the time I came to Barium until school started this year. On the house-cleaning group it was my job to help keep the Quad buildings clean. At Barium they are trying to give more of the students extra jobs to help them earn some spending money. My extra job is working in the campus Snack Bar on Saturdays.

When school started this year I acquired the position of assistant to the dietician. At this position my chief jobs are to scrub pots and pans and keep the kitchen clean. I get up at six o'clock in the morning and help prepare breakfast, and then after the kitchen is spic and span my work for the day is over.

In the afternoon after school is out we have football or basketball practice, and in the spring a softball game on Friday. Football is my favorite sport and I have been on the varsity football team for the last two years.

At Barium a great deal of the life centers in the school. With the exception of the ninth and tenth grades which are attending school at Troutman, we have our own school on the campus. We have very good teachers and the advan-

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tage of small classes. When I was in the ninth and tenth grades I was invited to join the Beta Club, an organization to recognize those with high scholastic standings. I was made Vice-president of this Club for this school year. I also am on the Glee Club and served as a marshal at commencement last year.

The Church is an ever present factor in everyone's life at Barium. Besides the regular church services on Sundays and Wednesday nights, we have the Pioneer and Senior High Fellowships for the young people. I am the Program Chairman of the Senior High Fellowship and serve as an usher in the church. This year I finally did something that I have been wanting to do for a long time. I memorized and recited the Shorter Catechism and received an award for it in the church.

I am a senior this year and in a few short months I will go to college or to the Armed Forces, and will eventually take my lifetime place in the world. ## Minimum Standards For Child Caring Institutions

### I. Statement of Philosophy

Every child has a basic right to grow up in his own family group and every family to rear its own child. The family group to which a child belongs can never be fully replaced by any substitute. When circumstances deprive a child of his family and he cannot be placed with relatives, society has provided several alternatives—adoption, foster family care, and institutional or group care placement. It is a major responsibility of agencies offering service to children to select the type of placement which most nearly meets the individual child's needs. The selection of appropriate care for children away from their own families depends on the relationship of several factors operating at the same time, such as the developmental needs of the child, preference of the parents, behavior and defenses of the child, nature and quality of case work service that will be available, etc. Also situations change with time, so frequent reviews of the situation are needed and new plans must be made when these changes so indicate. Economic deprivation in a family situation is not in itself sufficient reason to consider placement of children. As a general policy, children of pre-school age should not be in group care since these children, especially, still need the closeness of a direct personal tie with a mother and father even though they may be substitute parents.

Some children of school age for whom institutional or group care may offer a helpful experience are:

1. Children who have parents or relatives unable to care for them and yet so concerned by their failure as parents that they cannot agree to let their children have from a foster family the affection and security which they cannot provide themselves. These parents often can accept an institutional placement for their children until with help they achieve an understanding of their problem and what is best indicated for their child.

2. Children who have parents or relatives who love them but who are unable temporarily to care for them for a variety of reasons. These parents often can accept an institutional placement until they can again assume full responsibility for their children, when they cannot accept foster family care.

3. Children who have been so hurt by rejecting parents and disrupting family experiences that they cannot be receptive and responsive to foster parents and family living until after a period of understanding care and treatment

in the less personal setting which group care offers.

4. Children who present aggressive behavior patterns which foster families generally cannot deal with, but who may adjust well in group care. This group includes for the most part adolescent children who are in conflict concerning child-parent relationships and their struggle for emotional independence. The give and take relationship with other children in a group setting, the less personal relationship with adults, and the group acceptance of sensible limits often ease the tension causing the aggressive behavior.

5. Children in need of temporary observation and study for diagnostic purposes where suitable foster homes during the study period are not available.

6. Children in need of specialized treatment where small, well staffed group care facilities with appropriate case-work, medical, and psychiatric services can offer help.

The existence of a child caring institution in North Carolina is justified when it provides care for children whose needs can best be met by group care and when already available facilities have proved inadequate to meet the need. Such a service should complement and supplement other child care programs as part of a comprehensive social welfare program for children.

Those persons actively interested in the establishment of a child caring institution should first completely and carefully study the need for such a service in order to determine whether they would make the most valuable contribution to children by such an institution or by undertaking some other welfare activity. A conscientious inquiry of this type may reveal that other programs such as public assistance, foster home care, or family service will more adequately achieve the desired results for children without the much greater expenditure necessary to build and maintain an institution.

Since the basic purpose of the child caring institution, as well as all other child care programs, is service to children, the child caring facilities must keep abreast of new knowledge in the field of personality development and be prepared to meet the new concepts of care. The facility must keep a sound perspective regarding its place in the community. An institution which isolates itself from the community, either physically or by attitudes, cannot effectively achieve its purpose in providing a well rounded and integrated experience for the children it serves. It is equally difficult for staff to maintain varied interests and to participate in civic and cultural activities in an in-grown and limited atmosphere.

With the extensive development of licensed foster homes the children, institutions have increased opportunity to develop programs which will offer much needed specialized care for properly selected groups of children. Group care facilities should, with the State supervising agency, initiate periodic re-evaluations of their programs and purpose. In this manner their current usefulness and programs may be weighed with other resources to determine how they can best meet long time goals in child care.

The State Board of Public Welfare after careful deliberation with the Advisory Committee of the North Carolina Orphanage Association has established the following minimum standards to be met by child caring institutions. It is recognized that minimum standards alone can in no wise adequately measure the intrinsic values of an agency's program. These values will be found in the happiness, mental health, and moral character of each child under care. Minimum standards as here established provide a framework within which these intrinsic values can more easily be attained.

# MY LIFE AT BARIUM

What is a home? When people are asked this question, no doubt they think of a cozy little house with a happy family. At least, this would be the first inclination.

A home is an institution and a very important one. The father, mother, the children, and sometimes one or more grandparents, make up the home.

We depend on the home to perform many important functions. We usually think first of supplying the necessities of life—food, clothing, and shelter. The father is expected to earn the money while the mother takes care of the children and makes the home comfortable.

It is important also that we be taught many things in the home, including work, and along with work comes responsibility. At first a child receives a small share of responsibility, but as he grows and matures he can be held responsible for a larger and more important share of work.

Then, a home is a place to be loved. A person in a home is important. He feels this because someone cares for him. The love of a father and mother for the child in the home sets this child on the road to maturity.

Manners, too, are important and the home should be the place for you to be taught how to act decently at your own home dinner table, or in school, or in any situation.

Of course, discipline must be maintained in the home. Sometimes this involves punishment. We expect punishment when we do wrong. Discipline is essential for the progress of the individual. We must learn to take care of ourselves and to consider others.

At Barium Springs it is the purpose of our home to do all these things for two hundred children. Two hundred in a family is what you might call, "The Large Economy Size." Certainly, it is a large family in anybody's book. As for me, I have been at Barium four short years. No one can say that I have not appreciated it. Of course, there have been rough spots—no home is really peaches and pie all the time. But, at Barium, I soon became accustomed to the routine and I have learned to get along with other boys and girls.

I like football and Barium offered my first chance at really playing it. Like everyone else, I started off with the midget team. Now I am on the varsity.

Being inquisitive and curious kept me from being afraid to come to Barium. In fact, I was eager to see Barium. My brother was ten years old and I was twelve when we walked into the main office that first day to meet Mr. McClure and Miss Carpenter again. A new steam line was being laid, and

the campus was marred by ditches and great piles of red dirt because of this. But I wanted to see what kind of children lived here, and I went to school to find out. For some reason the children thought I would be a tall, brawny boy. They somehow thought "McKenzie" sounded like a name of somebody big. Well, when I walked into that schoolroom they had a surprise. I could just about walk under the pencil sharpener. After school was over, I gathered my bags from the infirmary and took them over to Jenny Gilmer Cottage. And so passed my first day.

In a football game you have a quarterback who calls the plays. The way he mixes and shuffles the plays has a lot to do with how successful the team is. Someone was now calling the plays for me and really varied them. Since I am from Raleigh and had lived in a city all my life before coming to Barium, I knew practically nothing about country life. But that did not keep me from being interested in the dairy. When I was assigned to work there, I had never seen a cow milked or even been in a dairy barn! I could not even pick up a straw bale, though I was soon strong enough to do so. I began as dipbucket carrier and progressed after a year to a milker. In our spare time we boys played horse shoes at the barn and we would play in the Bale Barn, which was not too good because we sometimes tore up bales of hay.

The next play called for me was the orchard. I worked there exactly one day, and because the carpenter shop needed another boy I went to work for them for one month. Then I started on what was to become my first steady job since the dairy and one I considered the least interesting. I will admit that housework never appealed to me—sink cleaning was bad enough, but waxing floors and washing windows were the worst. I worked at it for a year, and I know now that it does no one any harm to learn housecleaning.

Then, there was a stint of seventeen months of KP! I

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was the little big boy of the kitchen. Although it was somewhat like housework, the name of it was different. It was "Kitchen Boy" instead of "House Boy." The work on the Kitchen consisted of scrubbing porches, steps, and pots and pans, and cleaning pantries, cabinets and tables with a little loafing thrown in now and then. It was also my job to put the milk on all the tables just before each meal. "Where there is a kitchen, there is food" is my motto. I gained approximately twenty-five pounds in less than a year.

Now, for the past few weeks I have been working in the Print Shop where we put out the Barium Messenger. I have quite a variety of jobs, and here is how I would sum them up: from a dairy farmer to an orchard worker; from a carpenter to a house cat (as we call them); from a chef to a printer's devil.

I hope that this little personal account will give you an idea of what this Home at Barium is doing for all the boys and girls who live here. Someone has called it a "substitute" home—for me it has been a good substitute. Now that I am a junior in school I have not much longer to stay here. To live you have to make progress, and going out into the world is making progress, but leaving Barium will not be easy, because I will be leaving home.

## CONTRACT LET FOR TWO NEW COTTAGES

The Buildings and Grounds Committee met at Barium Springs on January 29th to open the bids for the new cottages. The Wagoner Construction Company of Salisbury was low bidder and was awarded the contract. The two cottages will be rebuilt in the same places where the old ones stood and will be one story fireproof buildings. Special effort has been made to make them as home-like as it is possible to do so for the sixteen children who will live there. There will be eight rooms for two children to the room, a housemother's room, dining-room, kitchen, and living-room, and back porch and play area. The dining-room, at present, will serve as a study hall and playroom. If there should ever arise a time in the future when each cottage needed to be self-contained, the cottage would be ready for it.

The architects of J. N. Pease & Company, of Charlotte have given study to the location of these two buildings and their type of structure as a kind of beginning for additional buildings if and when they are to be built. The one-story fireproof building is to be the pattern for all future construction.

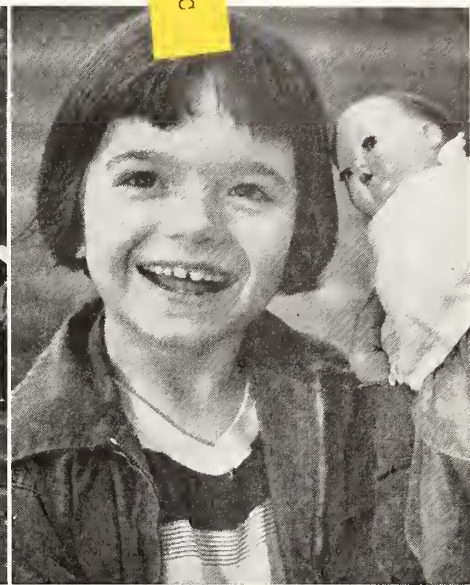
It is planned to have these buildings ready for occupancy in July or August of this year. It is hoped that the children can be ready to take up residence as they return from their vacation a little after the middle of July.

Since the Home is required to serve processed milk and since it is deemed inadvisable to erect a processing plant on the campus, it is necessary to produce and sell the raw milk and buy back the processed milk from the local dairies.

## BARIUM SPRINGS TAKES OVER NORTH PIEDMONT LEAD

ASHEBORO. — Forward Charles Ward shot, missed his mark, grabbed the rebound off the floor and shot again with 12 seconds left on the clock.

This time he found his target.

Barium Springs' Tornadoes took over sole possession of the North Piedmont Conference top spot in the resulting 56-54 victory on Ward's field goal. It couldn't have happened at a better time. Asheboro had one other chance, but threw a bad pass out of bounds and that was it.

The victory for Coach Archie Calhoun's boys was sweet revenge for a 59-34 defeat—their only North Piedmont loss of the season—that Asheboro pinned on them in their opening game this season. Since then, the Tornadoes have swept through the conference's opposition untouched.

An Asheboro rally in the fourth—plus the fact that two starters had fouled out and another was on the bench—almost cost the Tornadoes as the Blue Comets put on a fine stretch drive in the fourth. They pressed all the way to cut down Barium's 47-34 lead at the start of the period.

Barium's defense held Asheboro well in check in the first half, limiting the Comets to only four field goals. But the fine defensive work cost them heavily in fouls. Walter "Dub" Plyler, the fine center of the Tornadoes who is counted upon to supply the offensive punch, had four fouls

on him in the first two minutes of the second quarter. Plyler sat out the remainder of the half, coming back to lead Barium in the third period, only to foul out with 30 seconds gone in the fourth stanza.

Still the little center with springs in his legs racked up 25 points to lead the Barium victory. It turned out to be somewhat of a duel between Asheboro's Bennie Voncannon and Plyler. Voncannon, playing the entire game, sank 28 points, 10 on foul shots. Plyler grabbed 25, sinking 13 of 17 foul shots in the total. Both were rebounding well, along with Lawton Rice, Ronnie Hudgins and LeNair Burns of Barium and Ronald Henson and Tee Redding of Asheboro.

Shotwise, Barium gained the edge with 19 of 46 field goal attempts and 18 of 28 foul shots finding their mark. Asheboro hit 16 of 60 field goal attempts and 22 of 38 foul shots.

The first quarter proved decisive for Barium. They hit six of 12 field goal attempts and 11 of 14 foul shots to spring into a 23-13 lead. Asheboro managed only two of 12 field goal attempts and nine of 13 foul shots. That later resulted in the difference.

Asheboro grabbed the lead at the outset and held it for 2:30 of the first period and it was knotted three times. Plyler's two foul shots tied it up at 5-5, Ronnie Hudgins dropped in a rebound, Plyler hit two straight goals and two foul shots for a 13-5 lead with 4:04 left in the quarter.

FROM LITTLE JOE'S CHURCH

Assembly's Youth Sunday is always one of the high-lights in the year for me. At this time the retiring members of the Senior High Fellowship Council conduct the morning worship hour in Little Joe's Church and at the close of this service the new Council members are installed in a candle-light service.

The theme for our Senior High Youth this year is "Christian Brotherhood", which ties in closely with the Forward With Christ Emphasis for the entire church of "Christian Citizenship". Throughout the entire program on January 27th I was moved as I heard the young people express in their own words the Christian experiences and convictions which are theirs. This marked the third year of observing Assembly's Youth Sunday since I have been pastor of Little Joe's Church and I could look back and remember these same young people as they were beginning their Senior High development three years ago. Under the guidance of Christian cottage mothers, parents, church and public school teachers, campus workers, and the leadership of the total program of the church these young people have broadened their concept of Christian responsibility and soon will move out into other churches with the faith they have found through the witness of the church.

My reason for mentioning all of this is because of your relationship to Little Joe's Church and the Presbyterian Orphans' Home. Our witness here depends greatly upon each of you. I refer not so much to your gifts of money, although these are essential, but particularly to your continued concern and regular prayers for our work with these young people who are given into the keeping of the Synod of North Carolina. Many of these boys and girls would receive little or no Christian guidance were it not for this Home and this Church. From the Presbyterian Orphans' Home we have exactly 100 resident church members, in addition to an equal number who attend our services but who are not yet old enough to join the church. In comparison we have only sixty-five resident adult members over twenty-one years of age. Yet, into our hands is committed the wonderful privilege and opportunity of leading more than two-hundred young people to mature faith in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour.

At Little Joe's Church we do not shrink back from this tremendous responsibility. But as we offer our thanks to God who has given us the task and who will also supply the strength to carry out His work, we most sincerely urge you to remember each day the family that is yours, Under The Steeple.

MY LIFE AT BARIUM

At the age of seven, I came to Barium from another orphanage, and unlike most newcomers, I was not afraid. I had become acquainted with large groups, but not one quite so large as the family at Barium.

The day I arrived I was taken to the old camp on the Catawba River where all the children my age were enjoying themselves swimming and playing. One girl I noticed, who was then about eight, had lipstick and rouge caked on her face so that I could hardly tell what she looked like. I talked to her for awhile and

never thought that in later years she would become my best girl friend.

That night I was taken to the infirmary where I stayed for the first few days, and then I went to the Annie Louise Cottage where I lived for the next two years. I had a housemother who loved her orphan children very much. On the first day I moved to her cottage she brought out the Child's Catechism and for weeks she drilled me on it until I knew every word and could recite it from memory. I was a very proud little girl, two or three Sundays later, when I walked down the aisle of Little Joe's Church and received my New Testament and two dollars given by Mr. Belk.

Although I already knew my manners well, this housemother taught me the importance of using them. When we would go to church she would always say, "If you get sleepy, just pick one foot off the floor and hold it there." Or she would say, "If you think you are about to sneeze, put your finger under your nose."

As I grew older I moved on from one cottage to the next, learning something new at each cottage. The cottage which I remember most was Rumple Hall where we learned to wait on tables, scrub floors, and wash dishes. Every now and then I hear someone say that we were the meanest group on the campus at that time, but we were not really mean—we were just full of mischief and always looking for fun.

From there I moved to the Baby Cottage where I helped to take care of ten little boys. Living at the Baby Cottage was a great experience for me because I had a chance to teach them some of the things which I had learned such as saying "thank you," "yes, ma'am," and "no, sir." They also learned to brush their teeth, make up their beds, tie their shoes, and dress themselves. The little things which they said and did were what made my two years there enjoyable ones.

I now live at the Woman's Building and my job there is to help clean house and work in the kitchen. In the kitchen I help to prepare the food and see that the floor and dishes are clean.

Now that I am a senior and spending my last year at Barium Springs, I often wonder what it would have been like to live in a home with my family. As I think about it, I come to the conclusion that I am living with my family. Though it may be a larger one than most, it has taught me many things that otherwise I might not have known. There has come also the realization that God has put me here himself, and I will strive to make the best possible use of the knowledge and experience which my Barium home has given me.

From that point on, it was all Barium. The Tornados rolled up to a 16-point lead in the third as Plyler hit three foul shots and a goal with three minutes gone for a 45-29 lead.

Holding a 13-point lead going into the fourth, Asheboro narrowed it down to a 54-45 margin with two minutes to go. Barium was using Jim Bunnell, Randy Shaw and Donald Frazier, along with regulars Rice and Ward, when Asheboro moved fast. Goals by Bunnell and Shaw gave them some much-needed confidence to weather the storm as Asheboro pressed the inexperienced trio continuously.

Voncannon hit a jump shot; Caviness sank a push shot for 54-49; Donald Lineberry dropped in two foul shots and Tee Redding hit a goal and was fouled by Barium's Frazier to cut it down to 54-53. With 30 seconds to go, Redding's foul shot knotted it up at 54-54.

Barium moved down court. Ward shot and missed and Tornado supporters knew that was it. But the rebound rolled off the fingertips of Voncannon and Redding and Ward scooped it up off the floor, jumped and shot a perfect basket for 56-54 with 12 seconds to go.

That final goal was a fitting climax to an all-Presbyterian evening at Asheboro. Barium's girls captured a 65-58 win over the Comet sextette, gaining revenge for a one-point defeat suffered at Johnston Gymnasium earlier.

Again Asheboro fouls against Barium paid off. Both were fairly even in field goal attempts with Barium hitting 25 of 67 and Asheboro sinking 24 of 67. But Barium's 15 of 26 from the foul line against Asheboro's 10 of 21 figured in the final analysis.

Both were knotted, 13-13, at the end of the first period. Asheboro pulled into a 32-26 halftime lead and appeared on their way toward sole possession of sixth place in the conference standings. Barium rallied in the third period for a one-point lead and moved out front to stay in the fourth stanza on good defensive work by Nancy Kyles, Addie McEwen, Judy Bolton, and Janet Woodall, who was playing with an injured left knee.

Dolores Grayson and Shelby McEwen matched goals in the opening seconds for a 2-2 knot and Bernice Kuykendall's long push shot erased an Asheboro lead and enabled Barium to knot it at 13-13 at the end of the quarter. Grayson and McEwen again matched goals to open the second period, but Asheboro, with little Jane McGrary hitting from the foul line, moved away in the second.

Peggy Sellers could well be determined the difference for

Barium. The redheaded point-maker had four fouls on her in the first half and only five points. She threw in 20 points in the final half to team with Shelby McEwen and the long clutch shots of Bernice Kuykendall to notch Barium's third win.

Barium took the lead with 1:15 left in the third period on Sellers' foul shot 43-42 after knotting the tally twice. They never trailed from that point, holding a 13-point lead at one point.

Grayson, who was pulled by her coach in the third period, came on to spark the Asheboro bid in the final half, but couldn't match Barium's points after the Tornados had built up the lead.

## Dentists Visit Campus

The dentists gathered on the campus for a supper meeting and a review of the Dental Program which they have had in progress for several years. Members of the executive committee, Dr. Ralph Coffey of Morganton, chairman, Dr. Sam Steelman of Lincolnton, and Dr. Frank Kirk of Salisbury, review the progress made in the care of the children's teeth and the work of Dr. William S. Kirk who had been working for two days a week on the campus. The summary showed that whereas 175 permanent teeth were lost in 1951, the year before the program began, only five were lost in 1956 and four of these were for orthodontic purposes.

Two rooms in the infirmary have been thoroughly equipped for up to date operations. Gifts from the Presbyterian dentists within the State and the special gifts from the members of the committee have been responsible for providing this equipment. In addition to the services of Dr. William S. Kirk, Dr. H. V. Davenport is making regular visits to the campus and has the children who especially need orthodontia, under his care. # UNDER THE STEEPLE - Nuggets of News

## FROM LITTLE JOE'S CHURCH

REV. ROBERT R. COLLINS, *Minister*

Recently I was talking with a minister who was visiting our church and campus. He asked me this question: "How do you preach to a congregation such as yours which is composed largely of children and young people?" I assured him that this had given me much cause for concern nearly three years ago when I was considering the call to Little Joe's Church. Since that time I have come to several conclusions which guide me in my preaching. They are, at least in part, my answer to this question.

In the first place the needs of children and youth are basically the same as those of older persons. They need to know of a Father in heaven who loves them, and of His Son who said, "Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of heaven." They need the assurance that God is merciful and forgiving and that He watches over them with providential care. Like all people they need to be challenged to grow in the likeness of Jesus Christ, to discover His purpose for their lives and seek to do His will in every relationship in life.

But beyond these needs, I have found that the response of youth is far greater than I had ever realized. The average layman and minister I believe thinks that a child gains little from the Sunday morning message. Yet, my most attentive worshippers are usually young boys and girls. And weeks after I have spoken about a certain matter from the pulpit these young folks will remind me of it in a discussion at Pioneer or Senior High Fellowship. Unlike many adults, they come to church receptive and ready to take part in the hour of worship. Not only is the response shown in attentiveness, but in questions asked and the desire to do something about a particular project or need that has been mentioned in a sermon. The enthusiasm of youth is a reality in Little Joe's Church.

Having said this, let me close with a final observation. The receptive mind, the attentive spirit, the enthusiastic desire to do something about one's faith, which are characteristic of our Christian youth have caused me much concern. For I have realized more than ever before that day by day and week by week we who are Under The Steeple are molding permanently and surely the mind, character and Christian vision of these young people. They know only the Christ we live and preach, how imperative that we know Him fully and present Him fairly! Our Christian vision is theirs, how urgent that we escape the prejudices that are so foreign to our Lord's way of life! The character of each adult in our church stands out as an example to them, so we must strive with His help to be among "the pure in heart."

In brief, the Christian life of the boys and girls who worship in Little Joe's Church is but a reflection of what we give to them week after week. How necessary it is that we know Him well, whom to know aright is life eternal. How important that each of you undergird our ministry with unceasing prayer.

## DUKE ENDOWMENT YEAR BOOK GIVES SUMMARY

The Duke Endowment each year receives reports from the child-caring institutions in North and South Carolina. These reports are then summarized and included in the annual report which is published in its Year Book. The following is the report by the Director on the Orphanage Section:

The Trustees of The Duke Endowment assisted the child-caring institutions in the Carolinas with their operating expenses for the thirty-first consecutive year in 1955 when 39 child-caring institutions were assisted, 27 in North Carolina and 12 in South Carolina. The name of the Methodist Orphanage, Raleigh, North Carolina, was changed to the Methodist Home for Children.

Bed Capacity of the 39 institutions was 5,499 on December 31, 1955 and a daily average of 4,672 children were cared for during the year.

Children Cared For numbered 5,913 for the year 1955, with 3,090 of this number, or 52.3 per cent, being either full or half orphan children, while 2,823, or 47.7 per cent, were children with both parents living. The number of full orphan children cared for during the year was 443, 7.5 per cent of the total. Divided by age groups it was found that 3,119, or 52.7 per cent, were over 12 years of age; 2,565, or 43.4 per cent, were between six and 12 years; and 229, or 3.9 per cent, were under six years of age. There were 3,081 boys and 2,832 girls cared for during the year 1955.

Admissions totaled 1,187 during the year and of this number 1,115 were new admissions and 72 readmissions. There was a decrease of 24, or 2.0 per cent, in the number of admissions in 1955 as compared with 1954.

Discharges numbered 1,279 during 1955, an increase of 60, or 4.9 per cent, over the 1954 number. On December 31, 1955 the 39 assisted institutions were caring for 4,634 children as compared with 4,728 reported by the same number of institutions on December 31, 1954.

Days of Care rendered by the 39 institutions during the year 1955 totaled 1,705,289, with 923,044, or 54.1 per cent, being days of care of orphan and half orphan children and 782,245, or 45.9 per cent, for children with both parents living. The institutional days of care showed a decrease of .9 per cent in 1955 as compared with 1954. Three institutions conducted foster home care programs under direct supervision and reported a total of 52,417 days of foster care rendered, of which number 16,887, or 32.2 per cent, were for orphan and half orphan children. These institutions were assisted by the Trustees of The Duke Endow-

ment in the foster home care of orphan and half orphan children on the same basis as for care rendered in the institutions.

Employees numbered 1,011 at the 39 institutions in 1955 and based on the average number of children cared for per day, there was an average of one employee for every five children.

Schools. During the 1954-55 school term there was a total of 4,961 orphanage children enrolled in schools. Of this number, 2,639, or 53.2 per cent, were in schools maintained at the institutions and 2,322, or 46.8 per cent, attended public schools away from the institutions.

Mothers' Aid and Foster Home Care. During 1955, two institutions provided assistance to 42 mothers and 114 children in their homes. Three institutions provided foster home care on a direct service basis during the year for 200 children.

### FINANCES

Plant Values and Investments. The plant investment reported by 39 assisted institutions on December 31, 1955 amounted to \$23,477,187, and was divided as follows: land, \$3,284,926; buildings, \$16,430,974; equipment, \$3,443,747; and livestock, \$317,540. The average investment per child at the 39 institutions, based on the average number of children per day, was \$5,025. Invested funds were held by 26 institutions on December 31, 1955 and amounted to \$11,189,740.

Indebtedness on December 31, 1955, capital and operating, amounted to \$721,161, which was a decrease of \$50,490, or 6.5 per cent, from the 1954 figures.

Operating Receipts at the assisted institutions increased \$187,606, or 3.3 per cent, in 1955 over 1954 and totaled \$5,818,264.

Operating Expenditures for the year 1955 totaled \$5,209,861, an increase of \$235,307, or 4.7 per cent, over the 1954 expenditures. The average cost per child per day, excluding extra-institutional services, for the year 1955 was \$2.91, indicating an increase of \$.09 or 3.2 per cent, over the 1954 figure. At the 39 institutions the average cost per child per year was \$1,062.15, an increase of \$32.85, or 3.2 per cent, over the 1954 figure. More detailed information on this subject may be found in the tabulations on pages 39, 40 and 41.

Capital Expenditures for the year 1955 totaled \$2,164,827, a decrease of \$1,204,637, or 35.8 per cent, from 1954.

The Duke Endowment assisted 39 institutions for the year 1955 covering the days of care rendered orphan and half orphan children in the

The Children's Home Society of North Carolina, Greensboro, North Carolina, is conducting a special program in placing older children for adoption in family homes and \$5,000.00 was provided to assist this program during 1955. Including the Children's Home Society of North Carolina there were 28 institutions located in North Carolina assisted in the amount of \$186,785.54, which with the \$71,731.04 contributed to 12 institutions located in South Carolina makes a total of \$258,516.58 contributed for the year 1955 to 40 institutions.

They were given a medal and at the same time were recognized as the first boy and girl from Barium campus to be married.

with The Statesville Daily and The Landmark, joining the papers in 1921 and serving until they were sold in May 1953. He was news editor of the papers and he also, at times, did a bit of writing. He expressed himself in a most readable style and attracted favorable comments, particularly with the stories he picked up around the railroad station, where he loved to go on off moments. He liked sports, could report them in entertaining fashion and, as he had leisure, he found pleasure in attending local games, especially the ones at Barium.

Raised a Presbyterian, he had been an elder in the church for many years and was active in Sunday School work. He was a kindly and a willing neighbor and he was a loyal friend, gifted with a sense of humor that made him an entertaining companion.

On August 18, 1915, Mr. Gray married Miss Annie Hartsell and they established a home that has centered a very close, and a very outstanding family life, grandchildren, as children of the home, bearing testimony in their lives to its fine influence.

Mr. Gray has been retired since May 1953, and for the past two years and more he has been in failing health. He died Saturday morning at his home on the Wilkesboro road. ## CHURCH DEDICATION PLANNED AND NEW USE OF MEMORIAL FUND

The Board of Regents in their spring meeting approved the final plans for the dedication of the new church on Sunday, August 4th, 1957. The Memorial Fund will continue until that date by which time the total indebtedness against the Church

will be removed, and the Church will be dedicated in the special services wherein Dr. W. Talliferro Thompson will be the guest speaker. The Memorial Fund will continue thereafter and the money will be made applicable to the educational and training needs of the boys and girls of the Barium Family who upon leaving Barium need further assistance. The Board recognizes that these boys and girls are the children of the Church and ought, therefore, to have the support of the Church after Barium. While there is an Educational Fund at Barium Springs, the interest from this does not begin to meet the needs. The Board felt that the people of North Carolina would want the fund continued and would be glad to make an investment in the boys and girls of the Home. All who have known of this decision have expressed great delight in the choice of the Board. In the light of this decision, the administration of the Home has been able to make specific arrangements for a large number of boys and girls for the coming winter in their further training and education.

## NEELY FORD RECEIVES MEDAL

As a part of the high school graduating exercises special awards were made. The most coveted of the awards are the two Ace Medals. Miss Neely Ford, housemother at Barium Springs, was chosen to be the recipient of the Alumni Ace Medal.

Miss Ford graduated from Barium Springs and then took her college training at Flora Macdonald. After that she attended the Assembly's Training School and prepared herself for full-time Christian work. Being unable to fulfill her dream of serving in some foreign field, she took up work at home and taught for a number of years, and then came to Barium Springs as a housemother and has been faithful in her service for nearly two decades. ## Report of The Board of Regents of The Presbyterian Orphans' Home at Barium Springs, North Carolina, to The Synod of North Carolina, June, 1957.

The Board of Regents would pause to give humble thanksgiving to Almighty God for His goodness made known in manifold ways in the life of the Home at Barium Springs. The earnest prayers of the people of the Synod, the generous contributions of the Presbyterians of the State of North Carolina and Christian people beyond the bounds of the Synod are evident proof that God's love dwells in the hearts of people, and that He directs them in providing for the children of the Home.

The Regents have met in

two regular sessions since the Synod of North Carolina has convened. Through its executive committee and its sub-committees it has been in touch with the work of the Home. It is the unanimous conviction of the Board that the general state of welfare on the campus is good. The children have been blessed with excellent health. Through the work of the dental committee and the generous services of the dentist, Dr. Smith Kirk of Salisbury, an unusually fine work has been done on the teeth of the chil-

dren. Instruction through the school has been adequate, the religious life on the campus is normal and its results are above average. While it is not the intent of the Board to paint a rosy picture over all, it is their intent to say that things have been good during the year just closed.

Knowing that the Synod of North Carolina is interested in the finances of the Home, the Board would say first that complete reports of the auditors have been placed on file in the Synod's office, that the requirements of the Stewardship Committee have been met adequately in the preparation of the budget, and that the books of the Home remain open for the inspection of any interested person at any time that he wishes to know the financial status of the Home.

The Board would call to the attention of the Synod of North Carolina the fact that the Thanksgiving Offering was a little lower last year than in previous years. It would also call to the attention of the Synod of North Carolina that the change of the church year, bringing in the necessity of an Every-Member Canvass in November has in a real sense affected the taking of the Thanksgiving Offering and, therefore, the amount received. The Board would express its appreciation to all the churches for their giving to the Home at Thanksgiving, and would ask the churches who have found difficulty in having the Every-Member Canvass and the Thanksgiving campaign at the same time, to make adequate provision, if the way be clear, for the Thanksgiving Offering.

Within the recent years the campus has been greatly benefited by the erection of some new buildings. In 1952, the gymnasium was completed. In 1955, the new church was finished, also two new cottages and two brick dwelling houses. The Board is happy to report to the Synod of North Carolina that two of the oldest cottages which were becoming dangerous to be used are now being replaced by two new buildings. These new cottages will be one-story, fire-proof buildings, capable of housing sixteen children—two children to the room. It has been designed so as to be attractive in appearance and efficient in function. It was the intent of the Board to so build these two new cottages that they would set the pattern for the future buildings which are yet to be erected, if and when the money is available. These two cottages will be ready for occupancy in the fall and have been made possible out of the special gifts through legacies of friends. Even as fine as it is to have these buildings, it does not yet begin to meet the pressing needs that prevail on the campus for additional housing, farm buildings, and

warehouse and cold storage. These are pressing needs that always loom large in the thinking of the Board of Regents.

It is a happy fact that this summer will bring peaches and apples again for the boys and girls. The 600 peach trees are bearing well and the 800 apple trees are bearing adequately for the needs of the children, though not as abundantly as in former years. The gardens and farm are about average in prospect for the summer needs. Even in spite of some dry weather last year, a new peak was reached in the harvest of small grain—over 6,000 bushels. The crop is not quite as promising this year. Hogs sufficient for barbecue and country ham are now being fattened in the pens. The white-faced herd continues to grow. One of the most recent gifts was from the Morrocroft Farm, Mr. James J. Harris of Charlotte sending five of his thoroughbreds up to join the Barium herd.

Next year may hold something new in the farming at Barium Springs for the Soil Conservation Unit on the Third Creek watershed proposes, if the way be clear, to construct a dam on the Barium property for conservation purposes. This lake will afford opportunity for irrigation on one section of the farm and this will become the garden area. High hopes are entertained that this project will be approved and that this work can go forward. If anyone has extra irrigation equipment which he wishes to dispose of, let the Board of Regents know.

The Board of Regents would call to the attention of the Synod of North Carolina the need for qualified leadership on the campus. It is difficult to secure enough capable help to properly care for the boys and girls of the Home. It is necessary to reduce the cottage loads to where one person can satisfactorily serve that number. This calls for a larger number of persons on the staff and also the type of training being done calls for persons who are qualified in mind and body and spirit to render effective service with a large group of children. The ministers and elders in the Synod of North Carolina could be of real service in encouraging such persons to seek employment at Barium Springs.

The Spring of 1957 brought to a close a grand era in the life of Barium Springs. Many years ago when the life of the children was pretty largely work and school and not much play, a program of half-day work and half-day school prevailed. Under the administration of Dr. Joseph B. Johnston this was changed and the school was made to conform with the regular County School system. An athletic

program was begun to introduce the children to boys and girls of other schools. This performed a magnificent service for the Home. The Board recently adopted the plan which goes a step further in that the boys and girls of the high school are to be a part of the high school at Troutman, N. C., thus better fitting them to live in the community after graduating from Barium Springs. So, as the seniors of 1957 recessed from the halls of the Elementary School Building, high school commencements on the campus became a thing of the past. While there is a bit of sadness in the passing of any fine custom, there is also joy in the anticipation of the larger relationships and the better service to be offered to these boys and girls in the school at Troutman. A new high school building with a student body of 400 fine boys and girls working together will be a better thing than a small group isolated on the campus.

One of the great days in the life of Barium Springs is yet to come. On August 4th, 1957, there will be the dedication of the new church building. The Memorial Fund which began nearly two decades ago has continued and has now reached the point where the total indebtedness of the church will be erased by that date. A basket lunch will be served under the trees and the alumni gathering will be the feature of the afternoon's exercises. ## Light Weight And Fine Spirit Mark 1957 Football Squad

BARIUM SPRINGS—Almost a complete "new look" is in store for followers of Barium Springs' Tornadoes this fall.

The Presbyterians' single-wing attack will find new men carrying the load in the backfield.

The 1957 edition will be light, but speedy. Coach R. G. Calhoun, who has been conditioning the Presbyterians on Sloan Field for a seven-game schedule, said "we're going to be a little faster than last year."

Barium Springs lost heavily in the backfield last year and a major rebuilding job is on tap to revamp the Tornadoes' single wing. Line-men, moved to the backfield, are expected to carry the load, along with the lone backfield returnee, Fullback Charles Ward.

Calhoun added: "Best thing now is all the spirit and cooperation. They really hustle. If they keep that up, we'll come up to their full potential."

Barium, as usual, will have a small squad. The Tornadoes have 24 eligible men in high school and 24 candidates are seeking starting berths for the 1957 eleven.

But, as anyone who has followed the athletic situation at Barium very closely will know, the Tornadoes make up their lack of size in numbers and squad members with a never-say-die spirit that causes larger school, bigger opponents and rival coaches to wonder where all that energy comes from. The Tornadoes are not, and never have been, a pushover.

They've had their ups-and-downs. But if spirit and determination will win ball games, this year could well materialize into an "up" situation.

Ten lettermen are returning to the Tornado lineup this season, and the squad is predominantly composed of juniors and sophomores.

Richard Blackburn, a 139-pound junior; Wayne Wright, a 151-pound junior, and Jim Bunnell, a 156-pound sophomore, are back at the flanks and are expected to carry the load at that spot.

Jim Blake, a 150-pound junior; Donald Frazier, another junior at 155-pounds, and Ricky McArthur, a 141-pound junior, are returning at tackle. Frazier will also see duty at center.

Jim Kiser, a 154-pound sophomore, and Peyton Miller, a 164-pound senior, are letter-earners at guard. Miller is the biggest man on the squad at 164.

Charles Ward, the only returnee in the backfield, will probably run at both tailback and fullback. The 140-pounder is a senior. Randy Shaw, a letterman guard, has been switched to the backfield. Shaw is a 163-pound junior and is the second heaviest man on the squad.

Jim White, a non-letterman who played reserve center last year, is expected to hold down the pivot

spot this season. White is a 150-pound senior.

Shaw, who stands 5-11, has played backfield before moving into the line and will work at both the blocking back and tailback slots.

Harold Evans, a 147-pound senior, has been moved from tackle to the wingback position.

Several outstanding candidates for starting positions were carried on the squad last season and may play prominent roles in Barium's machine this year.

In addition to Evans, who will double at tackle, Joe Ramsey, a 158-pound junior, will be back for duty in the tackle slot. Graham Blake, a 155-pound junior, and Richard McKenzie, a 131-pound sophomore, are expected to see a lot of duty at guard.

Buddy Cochran, a 136-pound sophomore; Kenneth Joyner, a 139-pound junior, and Melvin McKenzie, a 142-pound senior, will work with the backfield unit.

Calhoun, when asked about his squad, reported no injuries in early workouts. He listed a tentative squad, with some of the boys doubling up in positions, as follows:

Left End—Wayne Wright and Rickie McArthur; left tackle—Donald Frazier and Harold Evans; left guard—Jim Kiser and Richard McKenzie; center—Jim White and Donald Frazier; right guard—Peyton Miller and Graham Blake; right tackle—Jim Blake and Joe Ramsey; right end—Richard Blackburn and Jim Bunnell.

Backs are expected to switch positions and Barium's starting unit is expected to come from Randy Shaw, Charles Ward, Kenneth Joyner, Melvin McKenzie, Buddy Cochran and Harold Evans.

Calhoun lost six good men from last year's squad. Three of the starting backfield unit graduated, and with Lawton Rice, Walter Plyler and Ronnie Hudgins all missing, it leaves a big hole and rebuilding job in the offensive unit. LeNair Burns, rugged center, also graduated, along with End Sidney Morrison, Tackle Mac McClure and Guard Oscar Utsman in the defensive unit.

Barium's seven-game schedule, all conference clashes in the North Piedmont Conference, will find four home games being played at Sloan Field, one of the most beautiful high school fields in the state.

*Minister:* Knowing that in this sacred place all who come may find forgiveness of sin, comfort in sorrow, joy in service, peace in God's will;

*People:* We dedicate this building.

*Minister:* For the gifts which made this building possible, for the services of those who enabled its erection, for the answered prayers it represents;

*People:* We give God the glory.

*Unison:* We, now, the people of this congregation, rededicate ourselves to God and to His service. Amen.

Now, as I look back to the Dedication Service it seems that we sought to proclaim in it the aim of our ministry in much the same way as did Paul when he wrote to the Colossians: "Him we proclaim, warning every man and teaching every man in all wisdom, that we may present every man mature in Christ." These studies come as a part of the Child Care Project in which the Southeastern Conference and the University of North Carolina in a cooperative effort provide this in-service training. Dr. Alan Keith Lucas, the director, assisted by Mr. Alton M. Brotten have scheduled regular study sessions on the campuses of the participating institutions. Also, they afford special information and help during the year and climax the program with the workshops at Chapel Hill during the summer months.

## CONCORD PRESBYTERY MEN HAVE RECORD RALLY ATTENDANCE

The Men's Rally of Concord Presbytery set a new record for attendance this year. President Fielding Clark had predicted that a host of men would be present and Barium Springs began to get ready early. Pigs were set aside for barbecue and everybody on the campus was alerted for special duty. And so when the day arrived the tables were set and 1100 pounds of choice meat had been barbecued, slaw had been made, and the beans had been baked, and the drinks and dessert were in place. From five o'clock in the afternoon until 7:20, the men filed by for the barbecue supper. When the line ended more than 700 men had pass-

ed the table. The boys and staff members of the Home were busy as bees getting this job done in a grand fashion. Following the supper, the meeting was held in Little Joe's Presbyterian Church. Reports were heard and inspirational addresses were given and the three churches having record attendance were Salisbury First, Bayless Memorial, and Prospect. The First Presbyterian Church in Salisbury took the top place with 62 men in attendance.

This annual event on the campus means a lot of hard work but it also affords great pleasure to the Barium family in rendering service to the Men of the Church.

## INTERESTING FACTS AND FIGURES FROM DUKE ENDOWMENT YEARBOOK

The Trustees of The Duke Endowment for the thirty-second consecutive year assisted the child-caring institutions in the Carolinas with their operating expenses. Beginning with 1956 the fiscal year used for requesting assistance from The Duke Endowment ended on September 30 instead of the calendar year, and the 1956 figures in this report are for the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, except as otherwise indicated. Future reports will be for the twelve months' period October 1 through September 30.

In 1956 there were 40 child-caring institutions assisted, 27 in North Carolina and 13 in South Carolina, one more than the number assisted in 1955. For the first time the Church of God Home for Children, Gaffney, South Carolina, which opened on January 1, 1956, was assisted. The name of the Free Will Baptist Orphanage, Middlesex, North Carolina, was changed to the Free Will Baptist Children's Home, and the name of the Christian Orphanage, Elon College, North Carolina, was changed to the Congregational Christian Home for Children.

Bed Capacity at the 40 institutions was 5,428 on September 30, 1956 and 4,632 children were cared for on the average day during the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, 1956.

Children Cared For in the nine months' period ending September 30, 1956 numbered 5,698, of which 2,923 or 51.3 per cent were full or half-orphan children, while 2,775

or 48.7 per cent were children with both parents living. The number of children with both parents dead was 383, being 6.7 per cent of the total. By age groups the number of children cared for were divided as follows: over 12 years of age, 3,067 or 53.8 per cent; between six and 12 years, 2,423 or 42.5 per cent; and under six years of age, 208 or 3.7 per cent. There were 3,003 boys and 2,695 girls cared for during the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, 1956.

Admissions during the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, 1956 totaled 1,063. Of these 1,063 admissions, 993 were new admissions and 70 readmissions.

Discharges numbered 1,157 during the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, 1956. The 40 assisted institutions on September 30, 1956 were caring for 4,541 children as compared with 4,634 reported by 39 institutions on December 31, 1955.

Days of Care at the 40 institutions totaled 1,268,997 during the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, 1956, with 680,356 or 53.6 per cent being days of care of orphan and half-orphan children. For children with both parents living there were 588,641 days of care rendered, being 46.4 per cent of the total. The average number of children cared for per day during the period was 4,632 as compared with an average of 4,672 for the 39 institutions during 1955. Direct service to children

# UNDER THE STEEPLE - Nuggets of News

FROM LITTLE JOE'S CHURCH

REV. ROBERT R. COLLINS, *Minister*

One of the most moving prayers in the Bible is found in Paul's letter to the Ephesians, chapter 3:14-21. In his petition Paul ask that "... Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith; that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may have power to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ which surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled with all the fullness of God."

To my mind this prayer offers us one of the finest insights into the life of the great missionary and preacher, and helps to explain why Paul was so successful in proclaiming the gospel of Jesus Christ. I have often wondered what would happen to the life of a church, any church, if there were those who each day would sincerely offer this prayer in its behalf.

Throughout the Synod of North Carolina there are thousands of Presbyterians who have a genuine interest in the work that is being carried out at Barium Springs. Each year churches send gifts that sustain the physical needs of our large family of children. And there are unknown numbers who regularly remember our Home in prayer.

Yet, this year as we move toward that season when you especially think of the Home and the Christian nurture you wish to provide for these boys and girls, I should like to suggest that prayer be a greater part of your offering than ever before. Perhaps you have never considered prayer as an offering, but it is my sincere conviction that intercessory prayer for the spiritual needs of our family Under The Steeple is as essential to our program at Barium Springs as are the gifts of food, money, and clothing. By His own example, Jesus indicated that intercessory prayer was vital to the Christian life. In the Book of the Acts and in the letters of Paul we find repeated emphasis upon the power of prayer.

We are certain of the genuine concern that you have for your Home at Barium Springs. Because of this deep love I hope that thousands of you all across the Synod will make Paul's prayer in Ephesians a guide as you remember us often before our Father's throne of grace. It is my firm belief that such a chain of prayer will greatly "strengthen us with the might of his Spirit in the inner man" and we shall indeed be bound together in the love of Christ so that His will may be increasingly known and done in our daily life at Barium Springs.

dren in foster homes was provided by three institutions and they reported a total of 40,326 days of foster care rendered, with 10,426 days or 25.9 per cent being for orphan and half-orphan children. The Trustees of The Duke Endowment assisted these three institutions in the foster home care of orphan and half-orphan children on the same basis as for care rendered in the institutions.

Employees at the 40 institutions numbered 1,031 in the period January 1 through September 30, 1956, which was an average of one employee for every four children based on the average number of children cared for per day.

Schools. A total of 4,876 institution children were enrolled in schools during the 1955-56 school term. Of the total enrollment, 2,622 or 53.8 per cent were enrolled in schools maintained at the institutions, whereas 2,254 or 46.2 per cent attended public schools

away from the institutions.

Mothers' Aid and Foster Home Care. Two institutions provided assistance to 38 mothers and 101 children in their homes during the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, 1956. Foster home care was provided 202 children on a direct service basis in three institutions during the nine months' period.

**FINANCES**

Plant Values and Investments. The 40 assisted institutions reported a plant investment on September 30, 1956 of \$24,489,290, divided as follows: land, \$3,273,631; buildings, \$17,415,435; equipment, \$3,502,590; and live stock, \$297,634. Based on the average number of children per day, the average investment per child was \$5,287 at the 40 institutions. On September 30, 1956, 26 institutions reported a total of \$11,367,300 held in invested funds.

Indebtedness, capital and operat-

ing, amounted to \$748,434 on September 30, 1956, which represented an increase of \$27,273 or 3.8 per cent over the figure on December 31, 1955.

Operating Receipts for the nine months, January 1 through September 30, 1956, totaled \$4,174,769.

Operating Expenditures totaled \$4,034,420 for the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, 1956. Excluding extra-institutional services, the average cost per child per day was \$3.18 for the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, 1956, an increase of \$.27 or 9.3 per cent over the average cost per child per day for the calendar year 1955. Using the average cost per child per day as a base at the 40 institutions, the average cost per child per year (366 days) was \$1,163.88, an increase of \$101.73 or 9.6 per cent over the figure for the calendar year 1955.

through September 30, 1956 totaled \$1,675,268.

The Duke Endowment for the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, 1956 assisted 40 institutions covering the days of care rendered orphan and half-orphan children in the amount of \$281,344.87, which included \$4,246.35 for the care of orphan and half-orphan children under institutional supervision in foster homes. The Children's Home Society of North Carolina, Greensboro, North Carolina, was assisted in a special program in experimenting in the placing of older institution children for adoption in family homes and \$5,000.00 was provided to assist this program during 1956. There were 28 institutions, including the Children's Home Society of North Carolina, located in North Carolina which were assisted in the amount of \$204,753.55 and which, when added to the 13 institutions located in South Carolina receiving assistance in the amount of \$81,591.32.

When it comes to the ears, be it an inside job or around the edges, we have to make them shine. Not only do we get the rough work on the boys like rusty knees and dirty feet, but, we also, must keep the girls fresh and dainty. More than 300 of us go down the drain each week. The boys choose the manly names and odors while the girls prefer the perfumed soaps.

I am a liquid cleanser, all 3,000 pounds of me, for I have to be ready for quick action. I am on duty 3 times a day, 365 days in the year. It is my business to see that nearly 45,000 plates are freed of syrup and gravy and potatoes and the yellow of an egg. I have to rumble and roar in the big dishwasher as the serving bowls from the 40 tables come sliding through for cleansing and I have to be quick and fast and easy on the draw when the 1,000 pieces of silver—knives, forks and spoons—come churning through the tubs. No germs can stay here because boys and girls must stay healthy.

The sixth, seventh, and eighth grades are being housed in the old High School building where there is ample room for the teaching of music and science together with the great advantages of a good

Central Library. It is hoped that a Central Library may be set up in the Primary Building now being used by the first five grades. We will then be utilizing all rooms in that building as the teaching

of piano is carried on in one of the rooms. This new organization should relieve the cramped conditions heretofore experienced, and present a better teaching situation in our Elementary School.

Interest and enthusiasm in our music program continues at a high pitch. It is encouraging to see boys and girls eager to sing in special groups or in a church choir. The quality of

# THE BARIUM SOAP OPERA!

I serve in two places—not only in the dishroom but, also, in the kitchen. Three 50-gallon steam pots must come clean. Frying pans, ovens, skillets, knives, sinks, mixers, potato peelers, and all must be ready for inspection and for use. It takes a lot of foaming and scrubbing to keep this kitchen and dining room and the cottage kitchens and dining rooms wholesome for the Barium boys and girls.

I am the powdered soap, sometimes scientifically called a detergent. Regardless of my name, my job is the same. I come in 400 pound barrels, eight times a year. It is my business to tumble and toil inside the big washer and what a struggle I have! Ten thousand pairs of blue jeans in a year's time surely do take a lot of me for it is some struggle to remove paint, apple stain, red mud, airplane glue, chewing gum, axle grease, cylinder oil, gravy and syrup from these boys' clothes. And that's not all. There are 25,000 sheets to be made clean for these children's beds are made fresh each week; to say nothing of the 5,000 dresses that I have to wash. While these dresses are not as tough as boys' clothes; yet, I have to curl up mighty close to get in the corner of a ruffle to get the dirt out. These girls are mighty particular about their school dresses and I have to have them clean; so, from sun-up to sun-down, it's tumble and toil—toil and tumble—in the big washer in the laundry.

I am speaking for a specialized group. They call me "goo grease." I am kept for the special occasions. After a lawn mower has been overhauled, a smokestack cleaned out, a car load of coal unloaded, the boys call for me. I look like a grease but work like a soap. I am not as big as the barrels in the laundry and kitchens nor as manifold as the bars in the bathrooms, but I fix up these boys' hands and make them real pretty for hand holding at date time.

How much of Barium's budget is used for soap? Only a tiny part when you realize that it takes 50 pounds of hamburger, 10 gallons of green limas, 1 bushel of sliced tomatoes, 20 loaves of bread, 8 pounds of butter, 30 gallons of milk, 20 pounds of cake mix, and 4 gallons of sauce to serve one meal. The "Soap Opera" with its exact figures in story setting can show how large the tiny items of the budget are and, thus, in contrast and comparison give some concept of the tremendous task in supplying the needs of the boys and girls at Barium Springs.

singing also improves with their enthusiastic response. It is a good sign when students look forward with great anticipation to taking part in a school or church performance. 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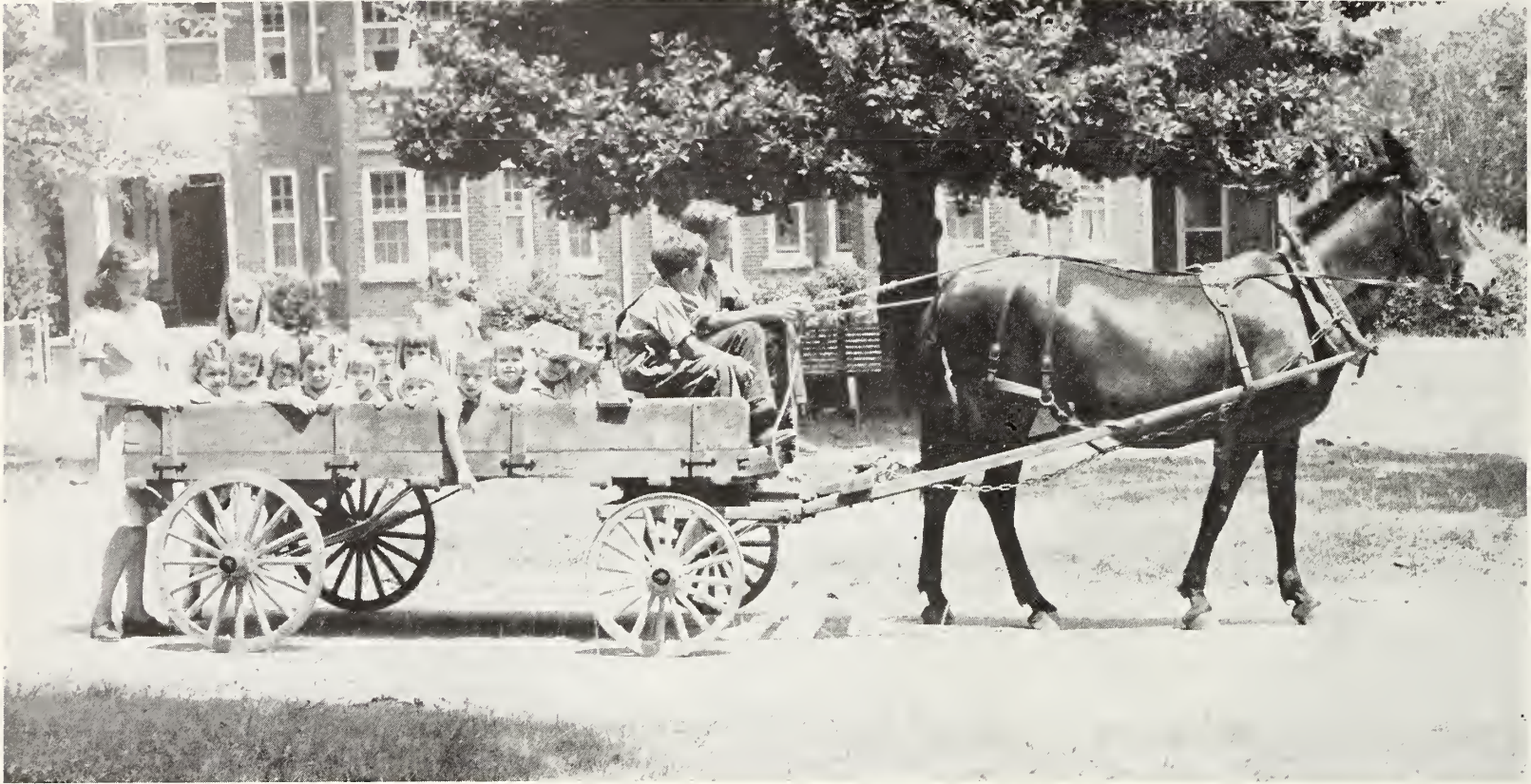

## FAMILY NIGHT BEGINS CHRISTMAS SEASON

The big dining-room all aglow with candles and Christmas decorations is the setting for one of the loveliest of the events of the Christmas season. All the boys and girls of the Home gather with the workers and teachers as one big family. A fresh green Christmas tree unadorned stands in the center of the room. When the supper is finished, during the singing of Christmas Carols, each person makes his way to the tree and there, making a gift to the big red stocking for someone else, takes a piece of ornament and decorates the tree. After this has been repeated several hundred times, the tree stands in full Christmas dress, and is ready for the lighting ceremony. Someone chosen in advance, the youngest member, the newest member, the oldest member, or some particular

person—is asked to turn on the lights. As the tree becomes alive in the beauty of the candlelight, the family sings "Silent Night, Holy Night," and the minister has the Christmas prayer. Thus the Christmas season begins with worship and sharing and carries through with all the services and joy of Christmas time.

Sunday, December 22, will see the special Christmas services within the church. Christmas morning the bell will ring early and under the starlight of the early morning, if the weather is clear, everyone will make his way to the church for a service of worship as the day begins. All gather in the big dining-room for a breakfast of cocoa, doughnuts, cereals, and fruits, and then to the Christmas tree where in each cottage stored

under the trees the Christmas packages await the hands of the children.

## Superintendent Reports To Board Of Regents

September 30th, 1957, brought to a close twelve interesting months on the campus at Barium Springs. New projects and procedures have been tried and in many instances found to be very helpful. The In-Service Training Program, under the direction of Dr. Keith-Lucas and administered by Mr. Alton Broten, has been of great value to the campus. The enlarged community experiences in the High School at Troutman have been helpful to the boys and girls. The period of change and the necessary adjustments have not yet been concluded and we may yet have some interesting experiences ahead. With the toils, troubles, with the joys and pleasures interwoven, we would have to say that again there is manifold evidence to believe in the goodness of God and His provision for the Barium Family.

The superintendent has been active in the work of the Home and has been participating in the organizations which relate to the Home. He has attended the annual conference of the Presbyterian group which met in Hugo, Oklahoma. Barium is a member of the N. C. Orphanage Conference which holds an annual meeting, and holds membership in the Southeastern Conference. The superintendent has the honor as well as the duty of being the president of this Conference now. The meeting will be held in Charleston, S. C. in March, 1958,—the 25th and 26th. It would be good if some members of the Board could be present for this period of study and discussion.

The superintendent and the staff of the Home have earnestly tried to carry out the policies of the Board. The Board will form its own conclusions as to what should be maintained and pursued and what should be changed or eliminated. If we have succeeded we are grateful—if we have failed we will be glad to have the Board remind us of what yet needs to be done.

by special appointment with physicians or through clinics where treatment can be offered. The Infirmary is under the direction of a registered nurse, and Dr. Thomas Griffin of Troutman is on call for the Infirmary and has office hours for the children. In addition, the facilities of Davis Hospital are made available to the Home for any service that needs to be rendered. Again, let me offer a word of praise not only for the services which the doctors, nurses and members of the administrative staff render our children, but the spirit in which they give it. A tenderness and an understanding that cannot be bought goes along with their service. Dr. Smith Kirk and the members of the Dental Committee are continuing to keep up the emergency work on the campus; and, as the Board will recall, Dr. Kirk, upon the completion of his special study at Chapel Hill, will again render us service at Barium Springs, adding his new knowledge in orthodontia.

### Case Work

A detailed report has been placed in the hands of your Case Work Committee. The enrollment of the Home during the past year was around 200, reduced by reason of having two buildings out of operation. These two buildings are now replaced and occupied. There are spaces in the Home for additional children and we anticipate reaching its capacity of 250. We have many more applications than we have room to admit; therefore, we have to discriminate between the applications that are made and consider those which are within the rules of admission laid down by the Board, requiring that the children be a part of the Presbyterian family, or children for whom a local Presbyterian Church is responsible. The superintendent and the Case Work Department question seriously the wisdom of admitting pre-school children to the institutional setting. At present we will admit a child who is as young as three years, but we discourage the admission of children under school age as much as is possible. The Board members must of necessity already be aware that a Home of this size with only one case worker is far below normal, and that the department is seriously handicapped by reason of the excessive load. If we are to fulfill the generally accepted requirements of case work for this many children, it will be necessary to lay plans for the enlarging of the Case Work Department. Miss Rebekah Carpenter, the present case worker, is usually busy sixteen hours a day six or seven days a week. We just need more like her to help carry the heavy load.

## Buildings and Grounds

One of the most discouraging features at Barium Springs is the condition of the buildings on the campus and on the farm. A tremendous sum of money would be necessary to repair these buildings satisfactorily. On the campus the personnel have been exceedingly fine in working under limited circumstances and with poor equipment. Every effort is being made to renovate or repair the buildings when money is available. During the year the two cottages replacing Annie Louise and Synod's have been completed and are now occupied. Each of these buildings, I believe, will be very satisfactory for living quarters for sixteen children and two adults. The people who are now housed there find a satisfaction in living in these new quarters. The Board will hear from the chairman of the Buildings & Grounds Committee about the home where the superintendent lives which should be known as "Jackson's Mansion."

Burwell Cottage has had some repairs. A new roof has been put on and the front porch which was falling in has been restored. A new furnace and stoker was installed and that house is now ready for operation and can house two families. The Laundry has been repaired and the new equipment has been purchased and installed. A furnace was installed at the Clendenin house and roof and gutter work was done on several of the cottages on the campus.

### Finances

The operation of the Home has been kept within the approved budget for the year October 1st, 1956 through September 30th, 1957. Some expenditures authorized were not made because of circumstances prevailing at the time preventing a right choice of materials and the proper purchase price. These unexpended sums will appear in the new budget request for new authorization in the coming year. The Board will be able through the report of the treasurer, the Finance Committee, and the Auditor, to get a complete picture of the financial structure of the Home. It is interesting to note that at the very time a necessity arises at Barium some provision, oftentimes made years before, will become manifest and the needs of the Home continue to be met. This is further evidence that the hand of the Lord provides for the operation of this place.

### Farm, Dairy and Orchard

These four units of the Home are called the productive enterprises and at the present time they are producing well, but it is also my conviction that future planning should be a real concern of the administration of the Home. The farm, gardens, dairy, and

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orchard could be so coordinated and inter-related in the use of machinery and staff that a greater production could be obtained without extra cost. This is a big operation and calls for carefully chosen leadership. The head of this department must have a broad knowledge in this field as well as practical experience. He should have understanding of soils and modern farm procedures, a knowledge of the dairy and beef herds, of irrigation and truck farming, and a knowledge of orchards and fruits. This is not to say that the present leadership in the operation is unsatisfactory. Each man in his department is to be commended, but his department could be benefited by a fuller coordination. Nor is this any reflection on the leadership of the present farm manager, but time moves on with retirement age moving ever closer, and when that time comes the Board and superintendent should be ready, having agreed on policy and procedure.

### Religion

Corporate worship services held each week are the Church School, the Sunday Morning Worship Service and the Mid-Week Prayer Service. The Church School classes are graded and enrollment for all departments from Kindergarten through Adult Classes is 217. In the Youth Groups which meet on Sunday evening the average attendance for the Senior High Fellowship last year was 34. The average attendance for the Pioneer Fellowship last year was 40. Miss Charlotte Calhoun, assisted in her work by Miss Shirley Kearns, the teacher of piano, has a number of choirs which are used in various ways in the service of worship. The Chancel Choir is composed of high school boys and girls and adults; the Intermediate Girls Choir, composed of sixth, seventh, and eighth grade girls, sings on special occasions. There is a Junior Boys' Choir

of the fourth and fifth grades, and a Junior Girls' Choir of the same grades.

In 1956 twenty-nine children were received into membership from the communicants classes, and in 1957 seventeen children have been received into membership of the church. Some of the boys and girls who have come to the Home were already members and have been received by certificate. Through the generosity of friends, the boys and girls of the Pioneer and Senior High Fellowship groups have had access to the summer camps and conferences. Last summer 24 Pioneers attended and twelve Senior High Fellowship members were at Camp Grier. The Youth Groups take a regular part in the Presbytery's programs for youth.

While a fine program of religious instruction does prevail in the church, in the school, and in the Home, it is the opinion of the minister and the superintendent that there is much yet to be done for the Christian nurture of the boys and girls. Perhaps the Home could best serve these needs through a graded program of instruction in the Elementary School through the whole of the week. This idea has already been approved by the Board and as soon as a competent person can be obtained, this work will be carried out.

**School**

In the school year which closed in May the freshmen and sophomores finished their first year at Troutman, and the school year beginning in September found the whole high school at Troutman. This naturally brings about change. Formerly, the life of the Home revolved largely around the activities of the high school. Since this has been removed from the campus, it has been necessary to find again a new center to establish a morale for the Home. The varsity athletic program having continued as a Home unit does assist in keeping up a unified esprit de corps. This transition has been much eas-

ier than we had anticipated. This does not mean that there are not serious matters which have to be adjusted, but it does mean that there has been an effective procedure which has brought about a good wholesome relationship. It is the intent of the superintendent to coordinate the life of the Home and the life of the community so that we can have a fairly normal relationship with the community activities.

As for the Elementary School on the campus, let the principal, Mr. R. G. Calhoun, speak through his report:

"Since the High School students are now attending school at Troutman, it is possible for us to set up a better organization for our Elementary School. The sixth, seventh, and eighth grades are being housed in the old High School building where there is ample room for the teaching of music and science, together with the great advantages of a good central library. It is hoped that a central library may be set up in the Primary Building now being used by the first five grades. We will then be using all rooms in that building as the teaching of piano is carried on in one of the rooms. This new organization should relieve the cramped conditions heretofore experienced and present a better teaching situation in our Elementary School.

The 99.3 per cent attendance figure for the last school year, and the 99.6 percent figure for the first month of this year attest to the continued good health of our boys and girls. All of our students have had three polio shots and the yearly check-ups with follow-up work are factors in our health program. All students are having their vision checked this fall in order that proper examinations and corrections may be made as soon as possible.

Interest and enthusiasm in our music program continues at a high pitch. It is encouraging to see boys and girls eager to sing in special groups or in a church choir. The quality of singing also improves with their enthusiastic response. It is a good sign when

students look forward with great anticipation to taking part in a school or church performance. The primary grades are working busily in a Rhythm Band and they should be ready to present a program during the coming year.

Finally, let me say that the spirit and enthusiasm in our football program is unusually high this year. For the first time on record all high school boys reported for football practice this fall and a large squad of Elementary boys are working out twice a week. It may be that the fine record of our boys' basketball team last winter added some incentive for greater participation."

It is with thanksgiving to Him that we report our work, and offer a prayer for God's continued blessing upon the Home in all its life and work.

## General Physical Exam Given Every Child

## THEY WRITE BACK

The following paragraphs have been taken from letters of former students received at the office in the last few months. They come from far and near.

I can never forget how happy the good people of North Carolina made me every year at this time, and it would certainly be a disappointment to me if I ever failed you."

From North Carolina:—"We celebrated our twenty-fifth wedding anniversary on December 17th, but as it came so near to Christmas we did not have a public celebration, and so we decided that instead of having Open House and friends bringing us gifts, we would celebrate it by sending a gift to Barium Springs. So, here is a check, and it is our Thanksgiving Offering to the Lord for such a happy life together."

From Toronto—"Thanks very much to you and your staff for the trouble and promptness with which you gave me such good service. I too hope this certificate will help my purpose.

Now, thanks for your very nice letter. It is one of my fondest wishes to visit the Home again before my days on earth are done. I am indeed proud to say that I was raised in The Presbyterian Orphans' Home, and I thank God for that fact. Indeed, it has been nearly fifty years or more since I was there. My memories of the Home are precious and most comforting.

Thanks again and may God bless and keep you and all the children of the Home in good health so that the good and wonderful work may prosper. Rest assured that I shall try to visit the Home of my youth if I am ever in range of it, and if you or any of yours should come to Toronto be sure to look me up and stop for a visit."

## A Concern For HUMAN LIFE

The North Carolina Conference for Social Service had its formal beginning on September 6, 1912, when seven leaders in the State who saw that North Carolina was lagging in meeting the social needs of its people, got together for the purpose of planning an organization of citizens with this common concern. Present at this initial meeting were: Dr. Clarence Poe, editor and agriculturist; Dr. W. S. Rankin, State Health Officer; the Reverend M. L. Kessler, Superintendent of the Baptist Orphanage; Dr. L. B. McBrayer, Superintendent of the State Sanatorium; Mr. W. H. Swift, Legal Advisor of the National Child Labor Committee; Miss Daisy Denson, Secretary of the State Board of Charities; and Dr. J. Y. Joyner, State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The first general meeting was held in Raleigh, September 17, 1912. It was agreed at this meeting that there was a need in North Carolina for an over-all social service organization that would concern itself with human life and conditions that affect human life—an organization that would seek to unite all interested North Carolinians upon "the threefold program of investigating conditions, awakening the people to the needs, and securing the remedies." Dr. Clarence Poe was elected first president.

The committees set up at this first meeting were indicative of the pressing social problems of the day, as well as of the foresight, courage, ambition, and energy of those early members. The committees were: Church and Social Service, Illiteracy, Reformatories, Criminal Procedure, Orphanages, Feeble-mindedness, Improvement of Country Life, Child Labor, Prisons, Liquor Problem, Race Question, Public Health, Taxation, Women and Social Service, and Associated Charities.

The Conference, then as now, had annual meetings

and the programs were outstanding. In those early days on at least one occasion when the annual meeting was held in Raleigh while the General Assembly was in session, the final Conference session was held in the hall of the House of Representatives and the legislators were invited to attend. Conference members talked straight from the shoulder about the urgent need for a law providing a six months school term, the need for a better child labor law, the importance of public health work, and the need for reform in our system of taxation. The Conference was responsible for most of the social legislation enacted during those early years and has been an important factor in much that has been enacted in later years.

Not only was the idea for the present county unit public welfare plan with a central State office conceived by the Conference, but the bill which became law in 1917 was drawn by a committee from the Conference. North Carolina pioneered in this field and its plan was followed by many states. The first Conference leaders had had a part in 1911 in the setting up of a public health plan similar to the county unit welfare plan.

The Conference worked diligently for the juvenile court plan; laws for the protection of children in industry; the six, the eight, and then the nine months school term; the Workmen's Compensation Act; foster boarding home care; and the program for public assistance to the needy aged, blind, and dependent children in North Carolina. Expanding health facilities, including preventive services of state and local health departments and the state-wide medical care and hospital program, have also been among its interests, as has housing as an environmental factor. These are by no means all of the areas in which the in-

fluence of this organization has been felt but just some of the major interests.

An outstanding job was done by the Citizen's Committee of One Hundred on Prison Legislation which was active in the Conference from 1922-1926. The work of this committee resulted in some constructive legislation affecting prisoners, with emphasis upon their rehabilitation.

It is difficult to single out the many places where some idea or action that originated in the Conference has affected some phase of the social progress of North Carolina. One of its purposes has always been to help educate the citizens of the State as to next needs in the field of social service. It has been the attitude of the Conference that if some needed job were done, the matter of credit for it is of no importance. This can be illustrated by the fact that the idea of having the Osborne Association make a survey of the prison system of the State originated in the Conference Adult and Juvenile Delinquency Committee. The suggestion was passed along to the Prison Advisory Council, the survey was made, and the results are proving to be far reaching.

As has been indicated, the Conference is now largely a study and planning group. There are, therefore, many areas in which the Conference initiates the program that makes for the beginning of the solution of social problems, while an existing agency, public or private, carries out the program. There are areas, too, in which the Conference makes the suggestion and promulgates the thinking regarding certain needs and the suggestion is adopted and followed through on by existing agencies or institutions.

In reality, there has been no change from the beginning in the purpose of this independent volunteer social service organization. Through the years the Conference has continued to work at filling the need that it was created to fill. Its object, as stated now in the constitution, is "... to initiate, foster, and coordinate movements for social progress in North Carolina." While the committee structure has changed somewhat and the committees are not as numerous as they were in the beginning, yet the present four working committees can encompass all phases of social service. These committees are: Adult and Juvenile Delinquency, Children and Youth, Health, and Special Projects.

The Conference is the one organization in the State offering a common meeting ground for all who are interested in social service—the lay person as well as the professional worker in both public and private agencies. People from all areas plan and

work together in an effort to extend the scope of social service in the State.

During the past ten years the Conference has turned more and more to studies which serve as a basis for educating the people as to next needs. Matters of legislation are now channeled through the State Legislative Council of which the Conference is one of the twenty member organizations.

Beginning in 1948 and continuing at the present time, the Conference has directed North Carolina's participation in all phases of the Mid-century White House Conference on Children and Youth. It was named by the Governor to do the job on the basis of its long and outstanding record of work on behalf of the children of the State.

More recently the Conference has compiled and distributed publicity on foster care for children and two brochures on guardianship.

A major project started recently, with plans to continue it over a period of several years, is in the field of prenatal care. A pamphlet on prenatal care, "Giving Your Baby a Chance", has been published and is being widely distributed in an effort to help reduce North Carolina's infant mortality rate. This pamphlet, written in the layman's language, is available without charge, upon request, by single copies or in quantity. Approximately 26,000 copies have already been distributed by the Conference and in cooperation with numerous interested agencies and organizations.

A study of health insurance in North Carolina is another recent project. A full written report of the study was compiled and this was condensed and published in a small brochure, "What of Health Insurance?". Approximately 12,000 copies have been distributed. Individual copies are available upon request and it is available in quantity for a nominal sum.

Among other current areas of concern of the Conference are: pre-school psychological examinations, moneys and fees collected in the public schools of the State, care of the chronically ill, special education as a means of delinquency prevention, an informational folder on the availability of constructive help for unwed expectant mothers, an a pamphlet on needs and resources for older people in North Carolina.

A Conference ambition is a film to convey to communities all over the State the scope of the foster care program, in an effort to secure additional foster homes, not only for the normal, but also for the exceptional child. Plans for this are fully developed awaiting money to carry them out. In the meantime

there is an urgent need for this contribution to the foster care program.

This very concise summary can serve only to acquaint you with some of the emphases in the work of the North Carolina Conference for Social Service. Its work is ever changing to meet changing times but its interest is constant—the whole broad field of social service in North Carolina.

## Barium Will Receive Love Gift From Women Of The Synod

The Board of Regents and the boys and girls of the Home were indeed happy to learn that the Women of the Synod of North Carolina would send a Love Gift to Barium to help buy bedroom furniture for two of the cottages which so desperately need new equipment. These two cottages are Rumpel Hall and Howard Cottage. The living-room at Rumpel Hall has been the special object of some folk in Wilmington, and has been very attractive, but the bedrooms of this building are very bad. The beds are old and sway-

backed and the mattresses do not fit; the dressers have no mirrors and will hardly stand up; the drawers won't work and when they do they fall apart; the chairs, if any, are old and dilapidated.

The beginning of this idea arose in the minds of some women who visited the campus and saw the conditions in which these girls were living and thought something ought to be done about it. The administration of the Home is exceedingly grateful that someone has come to the rescue and is now going to make provisions for these two cottages to have comfortable beds and adequate furniture and also add a little color and warmth to the floors and to the walls with the use of rugs and pictures.

It is particularly good to know that this will in no way affect the regular contributions which come to the Home for its annual operation. The Home must have the regular Benevolences and the Thanksgiving Offering if the daily needs are to be met. Now, the Women are going to make it possible, from the gift of their hearts, for the living conditions of the children to be brought up to normal.

## Father And Son Banquet Held In Dining-Room

During Scout Week, the Father and Son Banquet was held in the big dining-room on the Barium campus. Four hundred places were made ready and fathers and sons from the Iredell County Scouting Area were present for the occasion. Mr. Stinson and his crew had prepared special pigs for barbecue; Mrs. Neill and her kitchen force had busied themselves to make a delicious supper ready; Mrs. Pope and her dining-room girls had the dining-room all fixed and attractively arranged for the occasion, and everyone declared it to be a grand success. It was a grand opportunity for Barium to render service to the community, for whenever the facilities of the Home can render a service to the community or to the Church, the people here are ready to do their job.

Of course, this meant that the children had their supper in the cottages with their houseparents and that the dining-room girls stayed on for extra and longer work. They did not mind this as they were thrilled to see the Eagle Scouts and the other Scouts in uniforms and set their pretty heads in a tilting manner

## Stinson Reports On Farm Activities

Mr. Floyd F. Stinson, manager of the farm at Barium Springs, reports that he and his crews are awfully busy in these days since the exceedingly cold weather. There are one hundred and fifty acres of small grain which have had to be cared for. Eighty acres of corn land has been broken up and will have to be made ready for the planting of corn. The garden crew has prepared twenty acres for special truck farming and are now busy with the plant beds and their early planting. Onions, radishes, peas, cabbage and other early vegetables have been planted and others will be planted in the immediate future. Terraces have been repaired where the winter damage has affected them; fences around the pastures have had to be mended, and some frozen water troughs have had to be renewed. The lambs had to be cared for and the sheep and hogs have been taken care of during the cold weather.

Ten Thousand Pine seedlings have been set out in the reforestation and one thousand young Cedars have been planted. These Cedars were set out in order that the Christmas trees for the Home may be grown on the place. Top dressing for the grain and for the pasture and alfalfa has already been put out and the dairy barns and livestock barns have been cleaned out and the fertilizer has been put on the farm. All of this activity in the early spring bids for a busy summer to cultivate and harvest the gardens and crops which have been planted.

All in all, Mr. Stinson reports that the six hundred acres now in cultivation of the eleven hundred acres owned by the Home is in good shape and that he anticipates a good season and a good yield from his crops and gardens in the summer of 1958.

### New Pole Barn Now In Use

The increase in the dairy herd and the additions to the beef herd have made it necessary to erect a new lounging barn for the dairy cows. One-third of the area in the new barn will be used for the storage of hay; and, as this is fed out to the cattle, the moveable feed bins will push back and allow more lounging room in the barn.

feel that it will render excellent service to the Home. Incidentally, it might be said that this is the only lounging barn in Iredell County, and probably in North Carolina, which is equipped with a bath tub. That may sound a bit strange, but it is quite explicable when it is known that the old bath tub is a temporary arrangement for a watering trough.

### AN OLD STORY RETOLD

*Due to the frequent requests for the story of Little Joe's Church, it is being printed here again for the people who love the story.*

The pathetic life of our Little Joe Gilliland has been told in OUR FATHERLESS ONES in February, 1904, when he was taken from us by "The Reaper, Death," but the story of such a life is ever new, and so near to the hearts of our people, it will bear telling again.

On September 1, 1901, two children were brought to our home, Janie Gilliland, aged 7 years, and Little Joe, her brother, then about six years of age.

Little Joe was a frail boy with a warm heart, a very tender way of saying and doing things, and his whole personality was so unique, he would have attracted attention anywhere, and at Barium he was beloved of all the household, from Dr. Boyd down to the smallest Synod's Cottage boys no bigger than himself. Joe was naturally shrinking and timid, was no athlete, but he was a favorite on the campus, and enjoyed the innocent play that seems most attractive to small boys. His loving heart just loved everybody about him.

Little Joe had a very keen perception of "goodness and good things" and "badness and bad things."

The story is told of him that on one occasion one of the "big sisters" was teaching him his Catechism and told him to say in answer to a question: "The Devil tempted Eve and she gave the fruit to Adam."

Joe refused to say it, and when asked why, he answered "because it is a bad word." Joe compromised on calling the arch enemy, Satan, instead of Devil. We wish we could have talked with Little Joe about the stars, for as he would go back to Synod's Cottage after supper, he loved to look up into the heavens and talk about the stars. He never could quite understand "Where the stars went in the daytime," for he could not take in the idea that the sun was brighter than all the stars, and if he could have gone down into a deep well, and looked up out of the darkness, he could find some of those very stars in the heavens that had not gone away.

One night as he gazed upward he said, with tender pathos in his voice, "When us gets dead, us'll go up there," and Little Joe has already soared through the star depths, into the "Land of pure delight." Music was Little Joe's delight, and he had a most sensitive ear to all good harmony. Not only would he catch the bright popular airs in our Sunday School books, but even music that bordered on the classic, appealed to him, and he was not long in

learning tunes that were difficult. On one occasion the piano in Rumble Hall was tuned just before Christmas, and the first time Joe heard it after the tuning, he listened most intently for a while, and then said: "Is that the same piano?" When told something had been done to it, his quick ear caught the improvement, and he was looking into "the why" of it.

Little Joe's favorite song was, "When the Roll Is Called up Yonder," and how he delighted to sing it. We are quite sure he sings it now in Heaven having answered the call in his own dear little voice, that was so ready here to testify his love for Jesus.

Little Joe had one dominant idea which he often expressed in his own words, "When I get a big man I'm going to build a church with a porch to it." Many times did he affirm this, but it was through his early death that the fondest hope his dear little heart ever cherished in life was fulfilled.

On Sunday morning, February 1, 1904, our dear Little Joe, most unexpectedly to most of us, was called "to go among the stars," and find his place in the Heavenly Choir. He had not been well, but on Saturday seemed better, and sat up all day. When the other boys got up on Sunday, he begged to get up too, but it was thought best for him to lie quiet; yet he was told a place would be fixed for him. A big brother stood ready to carry him down. He noticed that Joe closed his eyes and seemed to be going to sleep. He took him up and carried him down, but it was our dear little boy's last sleep. In less than three minutes, his little heart was still and his breathing hushed. A great sorrow settled down upon our home, for we had parted with one who had filled a large place in every heart.

In Little Joe's purse was found 45 cents he had saved up toward the building of a church. Dr. Boyd told so pathetically the story of his life, that money began to flow in, in large and small streams, and in 1906 the building of "Little Joe's Church" was begun. In 1907 the church was completed and now stands a worthy monument to the memory of this remarkable child.

While in the Synod's Minutes it is put down as "Barium Springs Church"; it is best known throughout the Synod as "Little Joe's Church," and will doubtless be thus known for all time.

In our cemetery, Little Joe was the first to find a resting place, although we had previously lost two children who were buried elsewhere.

In this year of 1958 Little Joe's Presbyterian Church is celebrating its fiftieth anniversary, and it is rejoicing in

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the use of the new sanctuary which has been erected. While the first building centered around the life story of Little Joe, the second building could very well center around the life story of one known affectionately as "Big Joe". It was through the thinking, planning and dreaming of Dr. Joseph B. Johnston, superintendent of the Home from 1922 through 1949, that the plans were laid and the money secured through the Memorial gifts for the erection of a new sanctuary. This new sanctuary stands as a memorial to thirteen thousand, two hundred and forty-five people who have been remembered by persons from all over the United States. Standing as a memorial to them, it continues to carry the name of Little Joe's Presbyterian Church which has been associated with the worship of this community for over fifty years. As the cross high on the steeple is caught in the western sun, its shadow falls near the resting place of both Big Joe and Little Joe whose lives have been intertwined with the sanctuaries and worship of Barium Springs.

### Carol Harwell Goes To Johns Hopkins

For some time Carol Harwell, a member of the high school had been suffering from loss of vision. Dr. Reagan Stewart of Statesville found it necessary to send her to the Charlotte Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital. This examination resulted in the recommendation that Carol be sent to Johns Hopkins in Baltimore for a special study. Miss Rebekah Carpenter, the caseworker, and Carol have just returned from the trip to Baltimore. While there, Carol was given an extensive and thorough examination in an effort to discover her difficulties. The reports are not in from the doctors in the hospital, but it is hoped that this will result in discovering the trouble and offer some remedy for the situation.

### Southeastern Conference Holds 53rd Meeting

The fifty-third annual meeting of the Southeastern Conference for Homes for Children met in Charleston, S. C. at the Francis Marion Hotel on March 25, 26, and 27. Dr. G. A. Lialferro Thompson, for thirty-six years professor of Christian Education and Lecturer in Pastoral Theology at Union Theological Seminary and the immediate past Moderator of the General Assembly, was the keynote speaker for the Conference. In his inimitable fashion, Dr. Thompson discussed with the assembled group in the opening session, "What Boys and Girls Want Today."

In the second day of the Conference, Mr. Hamilton Bissell spoke to the group on "Scholarships at The Phillips Exeter Academy" in the opening session. Following this, Mr. Alton M. Broten, Associate Director of the Group Child Care Project in the School of Social Work at the University of North Carolina, conducted an Institute, using as his theme "Helping Those Who Need Us Most." This Institute was for two hours in the morning and two hours in the afternoon.

In connection with the Conference, the Board of Directors of the Child Care Project convened and laid plans for the continuation of the Project. The Chairman of the Board reported that every participating member of the group, except one, was asking to continue and several others were seeking the services of the Project. Expressions of appreciation were extended to the University of North Carolina, to the School of Social Work and its Dean, Dr. Arthur Fink; to his associate, Dr. Alan Keith-Lucas, the Director; and to the Associate Director of the Project, Mr. Alton M. Broten.

One of the interesting highlights of the business session was the report of the committee appointed to review the history of the Conference and to make a report. Dr. M. A. Macdonald presented to each institution in attendance a forty-page copy of the most interesting notes which he had made, and spoke to the group concerning his work in compiling the history of the Conference.

Miss Mary Bruce Roberts of the Hillside Cottages in Atlanta, Ga. was elected President to succeed the Reverend A. B. McClure of the Presbyterian Orphans' Home at Barium Springs. Mr. Everett

Also, at the close of the service at the cemetery, the same music again was in the air from the tower and over the whole campus floated the Resurrection hymns.

In the Morning Worship at the eleven o'clock hour in the Sanctuary the combined choirs, under the direction of Miss Calhoun, assisted by Miss Shirley Kearns, aided the minister in conducting the service of worship in commemorating the death and resurrection of Christ.

Two sons of Barium were guest ministers during the month of March. On March 23rd, the Reverend John Carriker, who is now pastor of the Eastminster Presbyterian Church in Charlotte, was the preacher. After finishing at Barium, Mr. Carriker graduated at Davidson College and Louisville Presbyterian Seminary. He has held pastorates in Missouri, California, Kentucky, Kansas, West Virginia, Ohio, and Texas. On March 30th, Dr. J. O. Mann was the guest minister. Dr. Mann finished high school at Barium Springs and then graduated from Davidson College and Union Theological Seminary. He has held pastorates in Virginia, South Carolina, and North Carolina. For more than twenty years the Synod of North Carolina was outstanding in its Religious Education Program under the leadership of Dr. Mann who was the Regional Director of the Synod of North Carolina.

Ernest Stricklin, now pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Hazard, Kentucky, and formerly a Barium Springs student, will be a commissioner to the General Assembly meeting in Charlotte.

The chairman of the Nominating Committee made the following statement to the congregation on Easter Sunday: "We would like to thank the members of the congregation for their help and prayers in the work which they have set us to do. We have visited many churches in the last few months. We made contact with one man and were disappointed that he did not feel led to come to us. We are not discouraged, but feel sure that, with the continued cooperation and prayers of all, we will succeed in finding the right minister for our Church."

The farm, dairy, orchards and gardens constitute a major operation. There are 600 acres in cultivation, a Holstein herd of sixty—milk-

ing forty-five, a beef herd of sixty — forty Whiteface and twenty Black Angus. There are around two hundred hogs raised each year, with one hundred of these going to the table, and with 1400 fruit trees on forty acres of land, and the farming and garden operations which take place, it is necessary to have a qualified person to supervise the work. Mr. Murdock's training and experience qualify him to assume the leadership in this field at Barium Springs. It is hoped that with the completion of the conservation dam, an irrigation system may be put in for the garden purposes. It is also anticipated that the Home will get into the chicken business for its own use, raising broilers and producing eggs.

It will be good for the community to have the Murdock family in it and it will be good for these four departments of the farm to have his leadership and supervision.

## VALUES OF GROUP CARE

(This article taken from the book "Readings for Houseparents of Children's Institutions.")

(Drawn from Reports by A. M. Broten, Consultant, Group Child Care Project, to the Junior Order Home, Lexington, N. C., December, 1956, and to Thornwell Orphanage, Clinton, S. C., January, 1957.)

Although not best for all children who must live away from their own homes, group care when functioning in the best interests of children and families can have special values which may not be found in another type of care and which are particularly essential, at the time of placement, for certain children. Among these values are the following:

1. *A wide variety of experiences and opportunities in being with groups of other children.* When these are properly organized and guided, a child may find acceptance, sense of being like other children, comfort, learning experiences, competition and encouragement, support, fun, control of own demands and drives, chances to lead and be led. In the right dosage and flavor, these can be especially beneficial to troubled youngsters.

2. *Framework for observation and understanding.* Many different staff persons working together but in different ways with a child provide the basis for coming to a better understanding of the problems and needs of the youngster. Each person, working from the same frame of reference, can pool information and ideas and goals and thus achieve understanding and move toward more effectively helping the individual.

3. *Availability of special help.* Being prepared and set up to help children and families who have special problems, the institution knows what to do, how to approach a situation, who to draw on for help, how to best mesh together services which are going to be beneficial. This may mean individual help from a caseworker, teacher, nurse, doctor, vocational training instructor, recreation leader, or authoritarian person. It may mean on-the-campus help or may demand services of others located off-campus.

4. *No pressure to form close relationships with adults.* Staff members do not rely on each child for affection, appreciation, spontaneity. Other children help balance out the living arrangement. There is time for individuals to proceed at their own pace. This is very important for a youngster who is confused in his attitudes and loyalties toward his own parents and is not ready to form close ties with substitute parents.

5. *Presence of many friendly and understanding adults.* Because there are several adults with whom the child comes in meaningful contact, he can usually find someone to whom he can respond. From this adult-child response, he can work toward a closer tie with other adults and even toward better feeling, in certain cases, toward persons outside the institution. To achieve this value, the group care staff must work together and have conviction about and respect for the contribution of one another.

6. *Regularity of the living plan.* More so than most private families, an institution must have a certain routine and orderly arrangement with which each person has a place and a part. Many things have to be done in a certain way at a particular time and by some individuals. Although there is always a leeway and flexibility, there continues to be a framework which remains constant and steady. This framework can be very helpful to the confused and disturbed child. He gains some security out of knowing that everyone is expected to do a job or follow a rule and that physical needs are going to be provided for at a regular time or on a regular basis.

7. *Permanency and stability.* The buildings, the organization, the routine—can offer a jittery youngster assurance that he will be cared for, despite his own failings or mistakes. For children who have moved about or whose parents have been nomadic, this stability may be sorely needed.

8. *Less personal attention.* No matter how aware staff members may be of the problems, the needs, or the progress of an individual child, they are unable to respond to as much of what the child is thinking, saying, or doing as a parent or

boarding parent. This can work to the benefit of certain youngsters, whose behavior has created issues and made it impossible, in private family life, for adults to exist with them. In group care, certain traits do not wear as heavily upon the houseparent who can rely upon other children, at a particular time, for affection and response.

9. *Protection.* Through its appearance and methods, the institution is in a better position to offer protection to children who need to be free of pressures, conflicts, upsets, and threatening situations. This does not mean over-protection either but recognizes that some boys and girls have been unable to progress or to grow because of unusual circumstances out of their own or family experience. The institution carries a greater stamp of authority than a boarding home, for example, and thus, for certain youngsters and families, may be of utmost service.

10. *Meeting-ground for parental participation.* Because the institution does not set up a family-type situation on campus, many parents who show capacity for planning and participating and doing something constructive for their children may show greater readiness and willingness to work along with group care staff than with other forms of care. Their own jealousy and feelings of inadequacy and fears of losing their children are not aroused to the same degree. They can gain from observing what the institution does or from developing and maintaining a participating plan.

In a good group care program, these values are there for certain boys and girls and families for certain periods of time. Children and their families should be helped to progress, as they are able, toward more normal living arrangements.

The institution cannot be all things to all children. It is unreasonable to expect this type of care to provide the following:

1. A maximum of personal attention and consideration.
2. Close relationship between child and substitute parents.
3. Many easy opportunities for family sharing in planning and activities together.
4. Much privacy.
5. Un-routinized living.
6. Unlimited flexibility of hours and permission.
7. As much personal recognition and identification as might be desired.
8. Sense of values which a child might get in a good home.
9. Extensive opportunities for normal community relationships.

There are children who need these benefits more than they do any which grow out of the values of institution life. Yet, they cannot live at home. For these children who can make a fairly easy adjustment in a private home and whose "own family" situation would not complicate the placement, foster family homes (boarding homes) have been developed.

As time goes on and as we have sufficient good foster family homes available, it will be important to continually weigh the values of the institution and the foster home placement for a child and determine, thus, where a child could best be placed. In most instances, this will involve a decision worked out with the "own family."

For six weeks, Miss Rebekah Carpenter, the caseworker, had been corresponding with parents and relatives and guardians in making the plans. Schedules had been made, bus tickets had been bought, lunches had been packed, suit-cases had been secured, and a thousand and one details had been attended

to, and the boys and girls were on their way for the vacation period.

It is the policy of the Home each year to try to place the boys and girls with their own relatives in their own home community for the two and one-half weeks that they have to be away from the campus. If it is impossible to place the children with their own people, a special effort is made to place them in their own home community with some people of their own church. When neither of these is possible, then the invitations which are so graciously extended are accepted for those who are able to be away from the campus. This year we got down to a skeleton crew of eight boys who helped to take care of the dairy, spray the apples and peaches, and mow the grass.

Three children who were admitted shortly before the vacation period started had

not intended to go and they have joined the other eight, making for a happy family on the campus during the absence of the others.

The strange quiet over the grounds and through the buildings gives this place a sort of eerie feeling, but after the shakedown run of the first few days, the group began to find its own pattern and form a happy friendship for the vacation period. Straw rides, watermelon cuttings, swimming parties, picture shows, and mountain trips are the order of the day during the whole of the season, so that the time at Barium during the vacation period is a very wonderful experience for the boys and girls.

## HOW CAN I LIVE WITH MY JOB?

(Prepared by the Houseparent Staff, Presbyterian Children's Home, Barium Springs, N. C., and A. M. Broten, Consultant, Group Child Care Project, in Workshops, September 9-13.)

The houseparent position embodies certain characteristics which make it different from many other pursuits. Many individuals have been able to be successful houseparents and to bring help to many boys and girls. Responsibility for creating an efficient position lies both with the administration of an institution and with the houseparent. By recognizing what needs to be done, both parties can move toward better care for children.

### What's So Different About Being a Houseparent?

I serve around the clock. Although I may go to sleep when the children do, I am on call and feel the responsibility for them.

I must live in. My room or apartment is in the same building in which I work. My room, besides being my bedroom or living room, is also my headquarters for my work.

I usually carry the immediate responsibility myself. I do not usually have a husband or an assistant who may come in later in the day to relieve me with the children or just to share adult ideas and viewpoints with me.

My total personality is exposed and also is extremely important in my work. I cannot hide myself or any part of myself.

Although there are other adult people on the campus, I have little time during the day to be with them or to visit with them. When I do, I start talking about my children and the other houseparent does too—we just can't avoid it.

Much hostility comes my way which, basically, is not directed at me. Yet, it is hard to accept it, especially from children with whom I have spent much time and effort to get to know and show regard and concern.

What I do in my group often has an effect or repercussion elsewhere on the campus. My responsibility interacts with so many other adults.

Even though I share my responsibility for my children with the supervisor, case-worker, and the superintendent, I feel my responsibility very heavily and am especially sensitive to criticism or comments about what I have done or not done.

I live in a "glass house." It is also a public museum, at times. We want people from the outside to know us and to see where we live. But this, too, complicates our life very much.

I always live with some crisis or problem. With so many children, there is always something to solve each day. Quiet, serene moments are few and far between.

Because my charges are children, they do not always show appreciation for my efforts. I try to help them in developing this sense, but realize, too, that true appreciation on their part may not come until they are much older.

I must be able to work well

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with other adults on campus—even those I do not agree with or who appear to offend me. I find that I cannot be too alarmed over the limitations I see in those around me.

I need to be able to handle a group as well as an individual. A youngster may do something with his group-mates that he would not do alone. I have to be a group leader.

My time appears to be taken up with handling my problem children, and I often do not have time for the more responsive, cooperative youngsters. Those who need me most are often the least attractive personalities.

Although the institution wants to provide me with working materials, I may have to wait long periods before I have what I need. I must have the patience to wait.

*What Must the Institution Do About My Job?*

Clearly define it—showing me where my major responsibilities lie and also where I must overlap with other personnel.

Give me a group of such size and content that I can realistically assume responsibility for it and be of help to the individuals.

Provide me with facilities and materials which make it possible to live comfortably and effectively with a group of children.

Streamline methods of procuring needed supplies, materials, and repairs, so that my requests are not held up merely through red tape.

Offer me good supervision, including orientation when I am new, support in trying situations, regular opportunities to discuss my experiences individually and in groups.

Keep me informed so that I know what is going on about the campus and with the institution in general.

Provide me with ways to develop as a member of the "team," such as through group meetings of various kinds.

Offer means whereby I may receive honest recognition and appreciation for my work and also incentives and immediate goals to work toward.

Provide me with training opportunities on a planned basis so that I can grow in my knowledge of my job.

Offer me adequate pay for my services so that I can be self-sufficient, pursue my own interests, and make some preparation for my own future.

Give me living quarters which allow for my need of privacy and comfort.

Schedule for me regular time off, so that I can plan and generally expect to have such time for personal purposes.

*How Must I Conduct Myself in My Job?*

In obtaining help and guidance in my work, I must fol-

low the lines of communication or "channels" which the institution has set up.

I must settle down to the job in my cottage to the extent that I feel content and do not seek constantly opportunities to be on the move.

I must be able to find satisfactions in daily association with the children.

Also, it is necessary that I maintain outside interests and discipline myself to do interesting things outside the institution at regular intervals.

As a problem or misunderstanding arises with another staff member, I should seek, often with help of the supervisor, to talk this out with the other person and not expend my feelings on to other people on campus.

I must try to continuously evaluate what I am doing and find opportunities to learn from others.

My job will become easier and more effective if I can develop interests and skills in working with children as individuals and in a group.

I must seek an understanding of each child—because only with that, can I live with difficult youngsters.

It is important that I be honest with children and recognize when I do not have the answers. In general, however, I must feel confident in handling my group.

Best results can be achieved if I am prepared to give and help each child in my cottage as he needs it, without playing favorites.

It is my responsibility to look ahead and plan for tomorrow with new ideas, activities, projects available which may be used if need be.

I must learn to recognize differences in children, so that I can allow for this in my expectations.

My own schedule should provide time for privacy and for rest. A worn-out houseparent cannot do much for children or for herself.

My work with other adults must include sharing of information and joining in common efforts and decisions, even when the latter may not be in total agreement with my own ideas.

*Of What Must I Be Convinced?*

To serve in this type of employment, I must have a conviction that the goals and objectives of the institution are right and that it truly has the capacity of serving and of helping children and their families. I must see its worth and thereby know, too, that my efforts day-by-day in the cottage and on the campus produce results.

I must be convinced that every person is worth-while and that his differences are as important to him as his conformities. I must understand that there are reasons for the other fellow's behavior.

I must be confident that, within myself, I have the ability and the inclination to help others, for their sakes and not for my own.

## In-Service Training Program Held On Campus

The annual In-Service Training Program was conducted by Mr. Alton M. Broten for a week during the latter part of September. This is the third successive year that this program has been in effect. Mr. Broten is related to the University of North Carolina and the Southeastern Conference in the Child Care Project which the University and the Southeastern Conference are carrying on jointly. Highly trained in his field and very successful in his service to this project, Mr. Broten has led the housemothers of the Home in considering their work and how best to serve in this particular place.

Two hours each morning during the week were spent with the group in group study. The afternoons and evenings were given over to individual conferences and discussions with members of the staff. This service rendered by Mr. Broten in this type of training is of invaluable aid in learning how to carry on the work in this Home.

## Four Attend N. C. Conference

The annual meeting of the North Carolina Conference for Childcaring Institutions was held in Kinston, N. C. at the Kennedy Home. A large attendance from all over the State gathered for the morning session to hear the address by Dr. Alan Keith-Lucas from the University of North Carolina. Reports were heard from the Department of Public Welfare through Dr. Ellen Winston, the Commissioner, and from the Children's Home Society of Greensboro through the caseworker, Miss McCoy.

After a delicious barbecued chicken dinner, the Conference reassembled for a business session and then divided into special groups for discussion and study. In the business session, John Vogler, superintendent of the Home and School at Union Mills, was elected president, Charles Kearns, superintendent of Mills Home at Thomasville, was elected vice-president, and Miss Mabel Bean was elected again to serve as secretary.

The Conference voted to accept the invitation of M. T. Lambeth, superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home in Winston-Salem, for the meeting in 1959.

## CONCORD MEN'S RALLY BRINGS OVER SIX HUNDRED TO CAMPUS

From five o'clock until seven-thirty on September 30th, folks were filing down the line in the big dining room for a barbecue supper. The annual rally of the Men of Concord Presbytery was in session. Select pigs had been chosen and carefully prepared for barbecuing. The dietician and her staff had added to the menu and by the time the men reached the serving line they had a "man-size" plate of supper. The boys and girls of the Home ate their supper first, and then spent the rest of the time serving the tables and pouring coffee and taking care of the guests.

Mr. and Mrs. Clendenin and the orchard crew had prepared a hundred gallons of

apple cider and everybody was served the fresh apple cider along with the meal. Boys and girls, teachers, staff—everybody was busy parking cars, directing traffic, ushering, washing dishes, cooking, or doing something in this grand project that happens once a year.

After the supper the men gathered in Little Joe's Presbyterian Church for the rally wherein they elected their officers for the year, heard reports from their leaders and had messages from Reverend Robert Turner, the Regional Director of the Synod of North Carolina and from T. Mack Blackburn President of the Men of the General Assembly, who lives in Knoxville, Tennessee.

## Duke Endowment Makes Annual Report

The Duke Endowment offers financial assistance to the Homes in North and South Carolina and on the basis of the reports of these Homes makes an annual statistical report which may be of interest to many people who do not have opportunity to see it in its booklet form and for that reason it is published herewith, and is as follows:

For the thirty-third consecutive year the child-caring institutions in the Carolinas were assisted with their operating expenses by the Trustees of The Duke Endowment. The period covered by this report is for the fiscal year ended September 30, 1957.

In 1957 there were 39 child-caring institutions assisted, 27 in North Carolina and 12 in South Carolina. Wilkinson's Home for Orphans, Cayce, South Carolina, did not apply. The name of the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina, Thomasville, North Carolina, was changed to the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina.

*Bed Capacity* of the 39 institutions was 5,394 on September 30, 1957 and during the fiscal year an average of 4,530 children were cared for each day.

*Children Cared For* during the fiscal year 1957 numbered 5,842, with 2,844 or 48.7 per cent being either full or half-orphan children, and 2,998 or 51.3 per cent children with both parents living. Full orphan children cared for during the fiscal year numbered 360, accounting for 6.2 per cent of the total. Dividing the children cared for by age groups it was found that 3,

199 or 54.8 per cent were over twelve years of age, 2,398 or 41.0 per cent were between six and twelve years, and 245 or 4.2 per cent were under six years of age. There were 3,101 boys and 2,741 girls cared for during the fiscal year.

*Admissions* during the fiscal year totaled 1,319, of which 1,209 were new admissions and 110 readmissions.

*Discharges* during the fiscal year numbered 1,387. On September 30, 1957 the 39 assisted institutions were caring for 4,445 children as compared with 4,541 reported by 40 institutions on September 30, 1956.

*Days of Care* rendered during the fiscal year by the 39 institutions totaled 1,653,448, of which 852,286 or 51.5 per cent were days of care of orphan and half-orphan children, and 801,162 or 48.5 per cent were days of care for children with both parents living. During the fiscal year ended September 30, 1957, the average number of children cared for per day was 4,530 as compared with 4,632 for the 40 institutions during the nine months' period ended September 30, 1956. Three institutions provided service to children in foster homes and reported a total of 62,018 days of foster care rendered, of which 14,136 days or 22.8 per cent were for orphan and half-orphan children. These three institutions were assisted by the Trustees of The Duke Endowment in foster home care of orphan and half-orphan children on the same basis as for care rendered within the institutions.

Employees during the fiscal year at the 39 institutions numbered 1,046 with an average of one employee for every four children, based on the average number of children cared for each day.

Schools. A total of 4,882 children in the 39 assisted institutions were enrolled in schools during the 1956-57 school term. Of this number, 2,483 or 50.9 per cent were in schools maintained at the institutions, with 2,399 or 49.1 per cent attending schools away from the institutions.

Mothers' Aid and Foster Home Care. Assistance in their homes was provided to 41 mothers and 112 children by two institutions during the fiscal year ended September 30, 1957. On a direct service basis foster home care was provided 253 children in three institutions during the fiscal year.

**FINANCES**

Plant Values and Investments. A plant investment on September 30, 1957 of \$25,788,178 was reported by the 39 assisted institutions and was divided as follows: land, \$3,281,257; buildings, \$18,412,113; equipment, \$3,790,592; and live stock, \$304,216. The average investment per child was \$5,693 at the 39 institutions based on the average number of children per day. The 39 institutions on September 30, 1957 reported a total of \$11,964,306 held in invested funds.

Indebtedness, capital and operating, on September 30, 1957, amounted to \$835,608, representing an increase of \$87,174 or 11.6 per cent over the figure on September 30, 1956.

Operating Receipts totaled \$6,222,577 for the fiscal year

ended September 30, 1957, an average of \$518,548 per month, which was in increase of \$54,685 or 11.8 per cent over the average of \$463,863 for the nine months' period ended September 30, 1956.

Operating Expenditures for the fiscal year totaled \$5,473,720. The average cost per child per day, excluding extra-institutional services, was \$3.19 for the fiscal year ended September 30, 1957 as compared with \$3.18 for the nine months' period January 1 through September 30, 1956, an increase of only \$.01 or 0.3 per cent. The average cost per child per year at the 39 institutions was \$1,164.35. More detailed information on this subject may be found in the tabulations on pages 41, 42, and 43.

Capital Expenditures totaled \$2,424,455 for the fiscal year ended September 30, 1957.

The Duke Endowment in the fiscal year ended September 30, 1957, assisted 39 institutions on the basis of the days of care rendered to orphan and half-orphan children and this assistance amounted to \$304,994.42, of which \$4,976.10 was for the care of orphan and half-orphan children in foster homes

under institutional supervision. A special program in placing older children in family homes for adoption is being conducted by the Children's Home Society of North Carolina, Greensboro, North Carolina, and assistance in this program in the amount of \$5,000.00 was provided during 1957. There were 28 institutions in North Carolina, including the Children's Home Society, which were assisted in the amount of \$220,215.56, and with the \$89,778.86 contributed to 12 institutions in South Carolina, made a total of \$309,994.42 contributed to 40 institutions for the 1957 period. A list of the individual institutions with the location, auspices, average number of children per day, total days, orphan and half-orphan days, per cent orphan and half-orphan days of total days, and contribution for the fiscal year ended September 30, 1957, are listed on pages 44 and 45.

In addition the North Carolina Orphanage Conference was provided assistance in the amount of \$5,000.00 for the second consecutive year in the establishment of an in-service training program for house-parents and cottage mothers and a consultation

service to executives and staffs of child-caring institutions in North Carolina and South Carolina. This program is under joint sponsorship with the Southeastern Conference of Workers in Homes for Children and the School of Social Work at the University of North Carolina.

## THANKSGIVING IS THE TIME

### LET US GIVE THANKS

### Barium Springs and Thanksgiving Are Synonymous

For more than half a century the Presbyterian Church has been stretching forth its hand to children, bringing them to Barium Springs where they could find shelter, security, happiness, protection, and training. During this time members of the Synod of North Carolina have been stretching forth their hands to make contributions to Barium Springs for the care of these boys and girls. It has been and continues to be a magnificent story.

The Thanksgiving season is now upon us and the people who, through their love for Jesus Christ invest in the lives of boys and girls, will be making their offering through the Church. There is no finer manifestation of pure love than when a man takes his own money and invests it in the life of a boy or girl whom he has never seen and whom he probably will never see. What a grand way to share in the work of Christ's Kingdom.

The boys and girls of the Home, while depending on the people of the Church for their contributions to the Home, nevertheless, do their part in the Home. This has been a busy summer. Three large trench silos have been filled with silage for winter feeding. The hay barns are bulging with hay that has been cut, baled and stored. The corn is harvested and is in the crib. The potatoes have been stored in the potato house. The apples have been picked and stored for winter use. The peaches also have been canned and frozen. The gardens, producing vegetables, have served the tables and filled the cannery and the freezer locker. All of this came through the work of the boys and girls along with the members of the staff who have been busy since early spring helping to take care of the needs of the Home. So, it is a blending of faith and works. It is the faith of these children in the people who provide for them and it is their work in the life of the Home such as running the laundry, washing the dishes, cooking, caring for the Infirmary, maintaining the campus, working on the farm, caring for the orchard, and looking after the dairy and all the other activities.

The greatest thrill that comes to anyone in this operation is the thrill of having a part. Let Thanksgiving time be the occasion of your investment and bear in mind that the Home, while it provides a great deal of its own food from the farm, has manifold expenses that cannot be met unless the people of the Synod give generously.

It will take time, effort, and organization on the part of the Churches and Church Schools to afford the people information and to secure their interest in and their gifts for the Home. Barium is confident that the whole Church will not fail to make provisions for its work on the campus.

Next above is Isaiah, whose tongue was purified with flaming coals—that he might truly render the great prophecies of the coming of the Messiah.

The bottom of the center lancet represents the Messiah. His uniqueness being His love for mankind, His vicarious sacrifice on the cross that all that believed might have salvation. Above this the Advent symbol, then the two sacraments of the church, Baptism and Communion, and finally the Phoenix rising from its ashes, which is one of the earliest symbols of the victory of life over death, as epitomized by the glorious resurrection of our Lord.

In the right lancet, bottom to top are the symbols of Discipleship under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Once again the Great Commission symbols are against a background of the cross; as the medallion is studied one discovers the globe of the world; the lamp for the Light of the Gospel; the pilgrims staff; the banner of the church triumphant; and the ship for the missionary. Above this are the symbols of the Apostle Paul—Man of Faith—missionary and writer who gave such impetus to the early Christian Church. Next above are found the symbols of Francis of Assisi, the shining light of the Dark Ages, who put his faith to work by feeding the hungry and clothing the needy.

Then comes Calvin's flaming heart, which was the torch of the Reformation—followed by Oikoumene—the symbol of the World Council of Churches—and of the On-Going Church of Christ.

Like the Bible itself, a great window is beautiful in its ministry—color being the language of stained glass—but it has to be studied over and over to get its full meaning.



The beauty of these windows is an inspiration to the Barium family in every service of worship.

### THE CHANCEL WINDOWS

#### LITTLE JOE'S PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The three lancet windows of the chancel were designed and installed by The Willet Stained Glass Company of Philadelphia, Pa. Mr. Henry Lee Willet designer, gives the following information: Instead of the traditional form I have used an extremely free form—the idea being that from the three symbols at the top flows the power of the Godhead in a never-ending stream from all time to all time. These symbols are: The creative Hand for God the Father, the Lamb for God the Son and the Dove for the Holy Spirit.

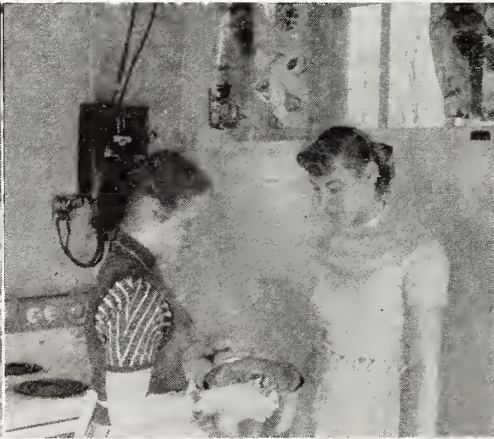
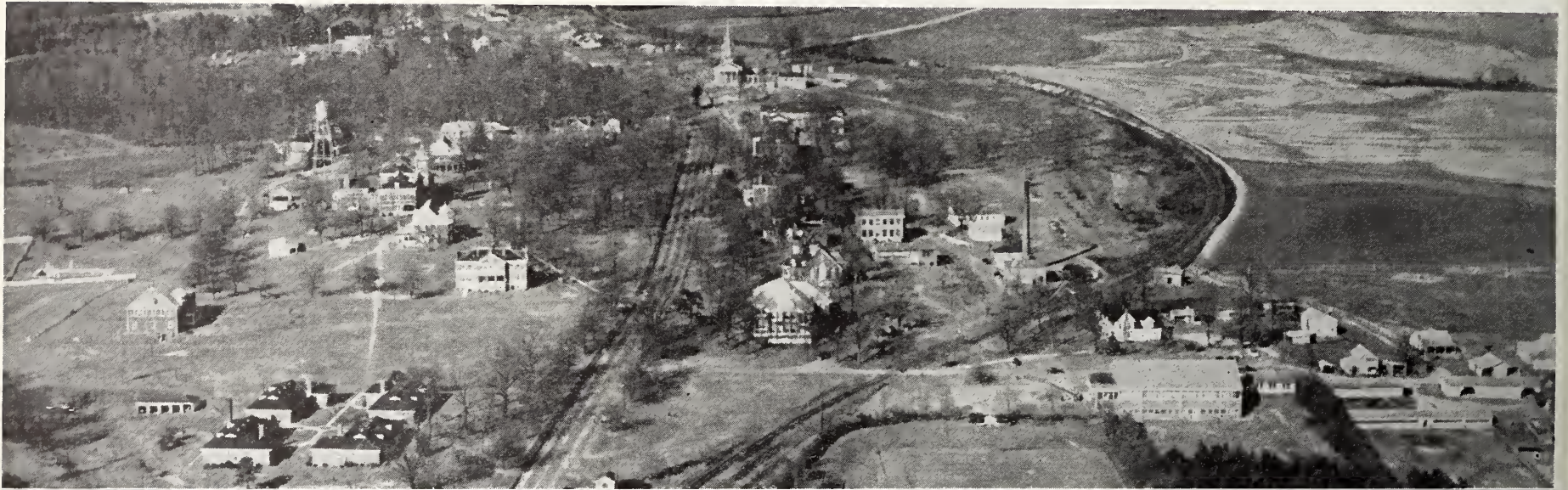
At the bottom of the left lancet is the Tree of Knowledge with the serpent entwined and the flam-

ing sword of the Angel of Expulsion set off against a cross indicating the sure promise that "The heel of the seed of woman would crush the head of the serpent."

Above the medallion is the symbol of Abraham—God's great promise that the descendants of Abraham would increase as the stars in the heavens. Next above is the symbol for Moses: the bush that burned but was not consumed, signifying God's call to Moses to prepare the children of Israel through the Law.

Above this is David's symbol—indicating God's promise—through Nathan—to establish David's house and kingdom forever. (II Samuel 7:12-17).

## Board Of Regents Holds Regular Fall Meeting

On November 12th and 13th the Regents gathered at Barium Springs for the regular Fall meeting. President M. C. Benton, Jr. introduced Dr. Robert F. Sloop, the new representative from Fayetteville Presbytery, Mr. Royall R. Brown of Winston-Salem, the new member at large, and Mrs. N. F. Dixon, representing Kings Mountain Presbytery. He announced that Mrs. J. R. Benson had been elected to represent Wilmington Presbytery, but she was unable to attend this meeting. Mrs. Colon McLean from Albemarle Presbytery and Mrs. R. E. Brooks from Orange Presbytery were welcomed back to the Board, as they began their second terms.

The Board received the report of the Finance Committee that, while the Home was not in debt, its approved expenditures for the year were \$4,000.00 in excess of its income. The Committee recommended that the Board diligently seek ways and means of interpreting to the Church the need for the financial support in order that the deficit of the year might not be repeated. The auditors' report was reviewed and ordered copies sent to the Synod's Office.

In reviewing the year's work, particular attention was given to some of the major needs. The Buildings and Grounds Committee strongly urged a big renovation program to bring the buildings into good repair, inside and

out. The water supply at Barium Springs has been a source of serious concern for many years. Three deep wells supply the water and two of these are red mineral which spoils the fixtures, discolors the clothes, and clogs the water lines. It seems inevitable that some special arrangement be made with the City of Statesville or that some other source be found for the supply of water for the Home. The Board expressed the hope that something might be done during the Spring to secure a swimming pool inasmuch as the old pool became a serious source of infection during the past summer and on doctors orders had to be closed.

The Board heard the reports of its committees: Case-work, Education and Religion, Farm, Dairy and Orchards, Buildings and Grounds, and Finance and Budget. The work of the Home during the fiscal year October 1st, 1957-September 30th, 1958 was approved as satisfactory and the Committee members were urged to plan carefully on the campus for each section of the Home's life and be ready to give a full and comprehensive report at the Spring meeting.

Each member of the Board upon leaving the campus was presented with a bag of apples and a jug of cider. It is hoped that the arrivals in their various home towns were safe and that no one was questioned while en route concerning the contents of the jugs.

Barium Springs held its annual football banquet last night and three members of this year's varsity club, which finished one of its best seasons in recent years, picked up the top grid awards voted by their teammates.

Blocking Back Jim Kiser, who doubled as linebacker defensively and was a key cog in Barium's single wing attack, was named the most valuable player in a ballot of the varsity squad.

The best blocker award went to End Wayne Wright, a consistent performer at the flanks for the Tornadoes' all season.

Randy Shaw, who directed the Barium attack in the tail-back slot, was named permanent captain for the 1958 edition of the Tornadoes.

The selections were announced by R. G. Calhoun, head coach at Barium, following a steak dinner last night on the campus at Barium Springs, attended by all the football players from the midget ranks through the varsity eleven, plus special guests.

Following the dinner, several members of the midget club, third and fourth grade boys, entertained with three musical selections.

Calhoun expressed his thanks to the persons at Barium who helped during football season and cited all departments at Barium for their help. "We had a wonderful year," Calhoun said. "It's been several years since I have been

## I REMEMBER

"It has been a long time since I visited Barium Springs, and a much longer time than that since I lived here," said the woman to the superintendent of the Home. "Although nearly a half century has passed since my leaving this place and my returning today, I still remember my days at Barium Springs.

"I remember that there were not very many of us here then, and the campus was not nearly as large as it is now, and there were no paved walks or roads. There was no church building on the campus. Times were hard and everybody had to do his part.

"I remember getting up at four o'clock on the cold winter mornings and going from my building over to the kitchen to help with the baking. We had no bakery truck to deliver bread in those days, and it was my job to help make out the rolls. I still remember how cold my fingers got in working with that dough. Morning after morning, we would trudge through the darkness of the early morn to spend hours in getting ready for the rest of the day.

"I remember, too, that we did not have the food which is now available. There was no surplus sent in from the government, there was no orchard to deliver apples, there was no cold storage for beef. The food was simple and plain and limited.

"I, also, remember that there was not much quarreling and fussing about the lack of things, but there was the feeling of necessity on our part to help do for ourselves in order that we might have and share. The spirit of comradeship and friendship that existed among the boys and girls and the family unit in that small group made a deep impression on my life.

"I remember how beautiful I thought the trees were. I used to just walk out under the big trees and stand and look at them, and when it snowed at Barium Springs I went into the highest ecstasy. Why, I even forgot to go to school one day. I started out from the cottage, across the campus, and under the trees with the snow falling and I got into such a rapture that I walked out into the woods and just walked around the whole morning, looking at the beauty of the trees and the falling snow. It was hard for my teacher to believe that I could be telling the truth when I told her where I had been and what I had been doing. But all my life, I have remembered the beauty of that morning and the glory of that day as I walked around in this lovely place and thought about God's world.

"Yes, I remember the days of work and more work than play, but some play, and I remember the people who were here at that time and their faith in God and their teaching us to trust Him."

After quite a period of listening to the lovely reminiscing of this former Barium student, the superintendent said to her: "But what after Barium, what have you been doing?" "After I left Barium Springs," she said, "I became a nurse, and through long years I have had a very pleasant life in ministering to people. Up and down across the eastern side of the United States, I have been extending my hand in the professional services of a nurse, ministering to the bodies of those who were sick, and I hope, through my spirit, ministering to the spirit of those who were downcast."

"It sounds like a wonderful life to me, and this is a thrilling experience, but you said that you had some business to which you wanted to attend. What is that?" said the superintendent.

She smiled and said: "Because I remember my days here and what they have done for me, I want to see that someone else who comes here has the opportunity to get some of the things which came to me. I don't have much, but what I do have I want to make provision for it to come to Barium Springs. I want to get the official title and I want to send, when my days on earth are done, something here that will show that I have remembered."

The superintendent of the Home at Barium Springs went out from that room with a warmth of heart that is seldom felt, for there he had listened to the voice of one whose life had been a blessing from childhood and continues to be a blessing in her service now and her planning will be a blessing in the days to come. Those fingers which through those early years at Barium Springs had almost frozen in the handling of cold dough had been guided by a warm heart to the ministry of the relief of suffering and pain, the gathering together of some of this world's goods, and through careful planning and saving, was now being made ready to be invested again in some other child who may stand in need. Fifty years of service had further endeared to her heart the experiences of Barium Springs and now had brought her back by this place to be sure that her business affairs were in order to do the thing which she wanted done, because she remembered.

## Happy Holiday Season Closes With The Return To School

The Christmas Season was good at Barium Springs. Although the day on the calendar is past, the spirit still abides. In the regular procedure, the Christmas week was begun with Family Night and the lighting of the tree in the dining-room. In candlelight and while the carols were being sung, each member of the family made his way to the tree, placed his gift in the big red stocking and then put some decoration on the tree. By the time all had passed by the tree was adorned and the stockings bulged with more than a hundred dollars to be given in the name of the family for Christmas. Christmas shopping tours were made to Statesville and to Charlotte and truck-loads of packages came in through the mail. Cars loaded with presents from Santa Claus made their way to the storage room where the packages waited until Christmas Eve when they were placed in the cottages for Christmas Morning. Christmas Day was a beautiful day. At 6:30 in the morning the families left their cottages and moved out under the stars, making their way to the church for a service of worship conducted by the Senior High Fellowship. This walk is one to be remembered. The full moon was setting in the western sky and could be seen through the bare branches of the big oaks on the campus. After the Service the morning sun was rising in the eastern sky and with all her glory she was beginning to light the earth and the frost on the grass sparkled like jewels. In the frosty cold, the steps were fast and hearts were light and voices were joyful. The Christmas breakfast was ready in the dining-room, and after that all went to the cottages where Christ-

mas trees were decorated and surrounded with packages. After the gifts were received from the trees, the time was spent in visiting one another in the various cottages and seeing what gifts had been brought to others.

At high noon in the big dining-room the whole family came together for a turkey dinner. Home-made cakes brought from Hickory and Laurinburg and special ice cream from a friend in Statesville and beautifully decorated for the occasion made a delightful close to this good meal.

The work of the Home requires a large number of people to keep the operation going. A former superintendent,

Dr. Joseph B. Johnston, said that the success of the Home in his administration was due to the help of the folks around him. That statement is still true. The success of Barium is due to the faithful service of those who are now here. Our newest staff members have been here three months and the longest tenure of service is about thirty years. If long hours and below average pay is indicative of faithful service, then this staff would receive a good report. The

Board's attention is called to the fact that the Home is constantly in need of additional personnel to fill vacancies when they exist and to replace persons who retire or leave the staff. Also, it should be borne in mind that people with experience and training adequate for doing the job will have to receive adequate pay for their services.

The Choirs of the Church were at their best in a Wednesday evening concert of great Christmas music in which the Girls Chorus gave a stellar rendition from one of the selections of Bach's "Christmas Oratorio." Mrs. Shirley Price was at the piano. The Children's Chorus lifted the hearts of the congregation in their singing of "The Snow Lay On The Ground", "Long Long Ago" and others. The Male Chorus did "The Annunciation" and "The Adoration of the Shepherds" and the combined choirs sang Ringwald's arrangement of "O Holy Night." The Congregation made a Thanksgiving Day offering of \$174.60. The Joy Gift offering was \$66.00. The congregation approved a budget of \$8,300 for the coming year which exceeds the current budget by \$2,200. Benevolences to Presbytery were increased from \$1,200 to \$2,000.

The request of Little Joe's Church to hear the Reverend Dr. J. M. Sydenstricker, Brazilian Missionary, during the World Mission season was granted by the Board of World Missions, and Dr. Sydenstricker will be our guest on Sunday, February 15.

The congregation will begin the New Year with observance of The Lord's Supper on the first Sunday in January, and on the same day shall welcome into its fellowship by profession of faith some twenty boys and girls who have been preparing themselves for Church membership by attending special classes conducted by the minister over a seven week period. to note the comments that are made about its appearance. This, however, does not erase the fact that there continues to exist in the buildings and equipment of the campus dire needs for repairs and replacements. Some of the plans for the year just closed have not been carried out, they will have to be renewed for the coming year. The purchase of furniture has been delayed because the report from the Love Gift has not been made. The installing of bathrooms in Lottie Walker has been designed and is ready to be done. The new year will call for major repairs in Howard Cottage, Sprunt Infirmary, the second floor of Lottie Walker, and the special study of Lees Cottage with the possibility of complete remodeling being necessary.

Attention of the Board is called to the condition of the old swimming pool. This subject has often been brought to the attention of the Board and it seems now that something will have to be done. Either the old pool will have to be closed and discontinued, or plans will have to be made for a new one. During the summer months the pool became a place for spreading germs and causing a rise in ear, nose, and throat infections. Upon the advice of the doctor, the pool was closed.

It is the considered judgment of the superintendent that the campus needs a Student Center Building. The boys and girls need a place to get together in wholesome fashion for recreation and fun. This is of an informal type and more also of the "party" type. The gymnasium serves the purpose for skating and basketball, dressing for football, etc., but it is too big and not suitable for the informal evening type of get-together and the "party" type building where something special can be held. It is hoped that the Board will look with favor on the erection of such a building and instruct the superintendent to secure proposed plans and estimates.

### FINANCES

The auditor's report is in your hands giving the comments of the auditors together with the detailed reporting of the financial operations of the Home. Also, the treasurer has prepared and distributed general information about the financial picture of the Home. Therefore, the statements of the superintendent would call attention of the Board to general conditions and trends in the Synod in the matter of support. The Home has complied fully with the rules of the Synod of North Carolina in reporting to the Synod's Office the amounts sent directly to the Home. The plan

of the Synod to have the contributions sent through the Presbytery's treasurer, through the Synod's treasurer, and then forwarded to the Home prevents the Home's office from being able to identify the source of many of the gifts and therefore has removed the possibility of a communication to the local church or individual giver. Some people, having been accustomed to receiving these communications, have thought that perhaps the Home was remiss in not sending out "Thank-you Notes", but the Home has no way of knowing the sources of the money and cannot, therefore, keep up the interest through correspondence. Once again, let it be said that the Board must interpret to the Stewardship Committee and to the Synod of North Carolina the financial program of the Home and the needs that are to be met here.

### CENSUS

More children are being cared for in America and North Carolina than ever before in the history of Child Care. There are also more agencies caring for children than ever in the history of Child Care. This, then, means that the Church is not carrying the full load but that the nation, through its welfare program administered through its State and County departments, are lightening the load on the institutions. Also, the fact of Social Security in the lives of many children has kept them at home where in other days they would have been forced to be cared for away from home. Our present enrollment at Barium Springs is about 175. The applications that are before us would indicate that the enrollment of the Home certainly would not exceed 225 during the present year, and possibly not reach that number. The applications in general far exceed the capacity of the Home. Some of the needs the Home is not capable of meeting and some of the children do not come under the rules of admission as established by the Board. It will be important for the Board and administration of the Home to study carefully the intake policies, interpret them to the Synod of North Carolina, and follow the will of the Synod of North Carolina in any proposed program for Child Care in the Synod.

### SCHOOL

The year just closed saw a change in the graduation procedures at Barium Springs, for in consolidating the high school at Troutman, the boys and girls of the Home graduated with the group in the regular exercises at the Troutman School. The transition from the High School on the campus to that off the campus has been much more tranquil than had been antici-

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pated. The convictions of the administration and the Board thus far have been borne out in that, while there are disadvantages connected with this new relationship, there are many advantages which seem to outweigh the others. The Elementary School had a good year on the campus. Some special work was done with the children in the Public School Music and also in children's choruses and in the Church choirs. Piano lessons were available for all those who wanted to take it. The quality of instruction was good and the school was eligible for accreditation, with the exception of having one teacher holding a high school certificate teaching below the seventh grade. This Fall the school is eligible for accreditation. Much time and thought, exploration and study are being given to the matter of the school. Nearly all agree that the younger children would be better served by being taught on the campus. Thus, it would seem wise always to have some teaching done at the Home. The real question is where the division should be made. The superintendent is unable to make a recommendation to the Board at this time for any additional change, but would seek the advice and counsel of the Board in establishing the most economical and wisest plan for education of the boys and girls.

### HEALTH

The average health of the campus is good. The major outbreak during the year was that of Asian Flu. It is anticipated that the campus will have more frequent attacks of diseases prevalent in the community by reason of contacts in the school at Troutman. In years gone by we have been more or less isolated and now in the new school relationship we will be exposed to the communicable diseases more frequently than heretofore. Miss Nancy Hoots at the Infirmary has given good service to the

students of the Home who have been confined in the Infirmary and has administered to the health care of all the students. Dr. Tom Griffin and his associate, Dr. William McLain at Troutman serve the Home. The services of Davis Hospital continue to be wonderful for the boys and girls. Dr. William S. Kirk has completed his year of study at Chapel Hill and resumed his regular program on the campus in dentistry, adding to his work his newly acquired knowledge in Orthodontia. Thus, the good work of the Dental Committee continues to be carried on and the unexcelled work of Dr. Smith Kirk in his care of the boys and girls will prevail. A finer spirit cannot be found in the State of North Carolina than Dr. Smith Kirk. Campus injuries have been about normal and football injuries were lighter than usual. All in all, the state of health at Barium Springs can be reported as good.

**WATER SUPPLY**

The 25,000 gallon tank standing near Rumble Hall is supplied from three deep wells. Two of these wells west of the Highway 21 are red wells and the one east of the Highway is clear water. The water supply presents a major question in the plans for Barium Springs. No fixtures can be kept decent with the red water running over them. No clothes can be laundered in this red water satisfactorily. The lines carrying the water become clogged and this reduces the pressure and makes the flow unsatisfactory in the buildings. Many analyses have been made of the water. The red seems to be a mineral content and cannot be removed. It is distasteful and discolors all fixtures. It seems indispensable that a new source of supply be provided. This could be done through one of several procedures. New wells could be drilled on the East side for the clear water. A stream might be impounded and the water filtered and pumped to the tank. There is some possibility that arrangements might be made with the City of Statesville for extension of their lines to the campus. Further explorations will be made and reports for future action will be made at a subsequent Board meeting.

**FARM**

This year brought to a close the services of Mr. John F. Stinson as Farm Manager. After three decades of service to the Home and having reached the age of seventy-one, Mr. Stinson retired as Farm Manager. Mr. Stinson was held in high esteem by all who knew him and greatly

loved by those who worked with him. A noble servant of God has served this Home well.

A new Farm Manager has been chosen. Mr. Roger Murdoch and his family came to the Home the middle of July. He is the son of Mr. Carl Murdoch of Iredell County, a well known Christian citizen of this community. Mr. Roger Murdoch grew up on the farm, graduated at State College, and served as County Agent in Iredell County and other counties. He is tireless in his effort and is high in his zeal and ambition for the Home. It is reasonable to anticipate that under his leadership the farm, dairy, orchards, and gardens will continue to improve and be an asset to the economy of the Home and the training of the children. People who know Barium Springs best and who know Roger Murdoch well are loud in their approval of securing his leadership for the farm and for working with boys and girls.

**CHURCH**

Reverend and Mrs. Hugh B. Carter, Jr. and their two children, Myra and Tim, came to live in the Manse in mid-summer. That was the beginning of something good for Barium Springs. The minister's leadership in the Church and his life and that of his family on the campus and in the community continue to be good for this place. It seems that the hand of God moved particularly and unmistakably in the placing of this family in this community. The Home and community are responding to the plans and suggestions of Mr. and Mrs. Carter and it is a cause for gratitude to God to know that this family is here for service in the work of Little Joe's Presbyterian Church. It is hoped that the Committee on Education and Religion will hold meetings on the campus and seek frequently the counsel of both superintendent and minister for laying out and carrying on an adequate program of Christian Nurture for the children of the Home.

## WOMEN OF THE CHURCH SEND LOVE GIFT

### Rumple Hall and Howard Cottage To Get New Furniture

January brought good news from the Women of the Church in the Synod of North Carolina. For many months the campus had been eagerly awaiting the report from the Love Gift which was being made to Barium Springs, especially the residents of Rumple Hall and Howard Cottage, for these two buildings were to be the first to receive the benefits of this gift. The goal had been set for \$25,000.00, but the Women of the Church in their usual fashion exceeded their goal and gave over \$27,000.00. What a magnificent thing this is — out of the love in their hearts, they make this investment at Barium Springs.

What a thrill for the girls in these two buildings to look forward to good beds with springs and mattresses which are comfortable and dressers with mirrors to replace the old ones propped up in the corners! Some of the furniture when moved actually had to be carried out in pieces because it fell apart before it could be gotten out of the building. Good quality merchandise has been bought at the lowest price available and the rooms are now beginning to look like they should. The girls had to get used to their new beds; the old ones had swaying springs and their mattresses dipped in the middle and there was no chance to roll out of the bed. The new ones rounded across the top caused some excitement when some of the folks in their accustomed manner of being in a hammock-like bed, rolled off of the top of the new ones.

The purchasing will continue and the bedrooms of Rumple Hall and the bedrooms and living-room of Howard Cottage and the two new living-rooms which have not yet been furnished will now be made livable and attractive for the children. What a difference it will be to have a nice new dresser to use instead of kneeling on the floor to place things in a box against the side of a wall. Plans are also underway to secure some pictures for the walls of all the cottages if there is enough money to do so. It is not a wholesome feeling to enter a building and find not a picture hanging on the wall of the hall, living-room or in the children's rooms. One of the graces for home-like living is pictures hanging in the house. To that end, the administration is working hard to see that the living-rooms and bedrooms are made attractive.

All the children of these cottages, the youngest to the oldest, will long remember the change that has taken place in their living quarters and how it came about. To the Women of the Synod of North Carolina the whole Home would send its deepest appreciation for this Love Gift to Barium Springs.

### New Scout Program Proving Successful

In the Fall of 1958 the boys of the Home interested in Scouting were enrolled in Scout Troops in Statesville. Twenty-two boys joined four different troops. The Scoutmasters of these four troops had expressed their willingness to have additional members brought in, and so the Barium boys became a part of the regular Scouting program within the established troops in the churches in Statesville. This affords these boys a good Scouting program with a group of boys other than the ones whom they see all day long every day. Thus far the Scout Council and the Scoutmasters have felt this to be a fine procedure and the boys at Barium Springs are

quite delighted with the opportunity of being a part of the various troops.

During the Christmas holidays, many people sent Christmas money for Scout uniforms. Mr. C. G. Steele who is in charge of this part of the Home's work and who arranges for the boys' transportation and Scouting needs announces that twenty have passed the second-class rank and are now ready for the Scout uniform which has been promised them. It is hoped that this entire program may be continued and enlarged and that all the boys of the Home who are interested in Scouting can be fully equipped and take a regular and normal part in a community activity.



### AN OPEN LETTER TO LOUISE

Dear Louise:

Not long ago in a letter to Miss Rebekah Carpenter, the caseworker, you said "My picture was in the Winston-Salem paper one evening as one of the new teachers. Sidney Bost who took the picture sent me two glossy prints. I would like for you to have one for your bulletin board (on which I used to dream of getting my picture)." Not only will your picture be on the bulletin board in Miss Carpenter's office, but mailed out now to approximately twenty-five thousand other people.

As we look at the picture, what fond recollections we have of your days at Barium Springs. The chubby little girl who was the youngest of three sisters made her way

from cottage to cottage until she became one of the big girls and then made an excellent Big Sister for the little boys at Synod's Cottage. I am sure that you recall the many things which took place on this campus between 1940 when you entered Barium and 1954 when you graduated. How proud we were of you as you went down the aisle as a member of the senior class at graduation.

We hated to see you leave the campus and yet we were delighted to see you enrolled at Montreat College. Your record there was a good one and another day of thrill and excitement was the graduation in 1958. We were proud of the work you had done and for the field in which you had

prepared yourself to render service.

Sometimes things which seem rather small have a very large meaning. Miss Carpenter and I still remark on the fact that after you had used the linens, blankets and towels during college that you then had them carefully laundered, neatly wrapped in a package and returned to the Home. Just as you had been dependable while at Barium Springs, you continued your good ways and further showed the fine traits of character that make up your disposition.

Now, you are a school teacher. How different things look in the schoolroom from what they did when you were

## UNDER THE STEEPLE

There was considerable coming and going under the steeple during the year 1958, more going in fact than coming. In addition to the going of the former minister on January 1st and the coming of the new minister on June 29, there were 87 dismissals and 14 accessions between January 1 and December 31. We lost one member by death, 25 by transfer of letter and 61 were placed on the retired roll. This means that there are now 107 members of Little Joe's Church who have long since left this community and are living elsewhere without identifying themselves with the Church in the community where they now reside. With this report goes an earnest plea from the minister to all who read this column beyond the environs of Barium Springs to consider their obligation and privilege as citizens of the kingdom; and to reconsider their loyalty to the Church of Jesus Christ in the community where they live; become active members in your local church. All who request transfers of letter will be dismissed from Little Joe's Church in good standing and commended to the fellowship of the church of their choosing. To offset our losses last year, we received 14 new members, 13 by certificate and one on profession of faith, giving us a total active membership of 205. Your minister delved into the archives in a recent trip to the library of Union Theological Seminary and read with interest from the Minutes of Concord Presbytery in the year 1908 where the organization of Little Joe's Church is recorded. He copied down the names of 67 charter members who were received on profession of faith (62 were baptized that Sunday, May 10, 1908) and the names of 52 more persons who were received as charter members by certificate (47 came from the Presbyterian Church at Troutman) —making a total of 119 Charter Members. Two elders were elected, John W. Clark and W. B. Parks, along with two deacons: George M. Young and Walter Bailey. The first minister was the Reverend W. M. Walsh, who is now associate minister at the First Presbyterian Church in Charlotte. The first superintendent of the Sunday School was John Wakefield. It is significant that the total number of communicants reported in the year 1914 was 204—just one less than the number reported last year. This means that Little Joe's Church is a "producer" church, sending out approximately as many members as we receive year after year. Our primary function is to gather and train and teach and nourish young lives in the Christian Faith, and to send out young men and women to be leaders of churches in the towns and cities and wherever they may go from here.

Still speaking of the membership of the church, it is good to report that on the first Sunday in January this year, 15 new members were added by profession of faith in Jesus Christ: Kenneth Brewer, Karen Crews, Robert Grier, Everett Heritage, Joyce Ann Hughes, Dwight Lefler, Larry Joyner, Clyde Mace, Walter Snead, Mary Tyndall, Kenneth Utsman, Leon Waters, Arthur Weincken, Abner Wilkins, and Larry Wilkins. Glenn Houck was added by certificate from the Presbyterian Church at Matthews, N. C. Since the first of the year we have dismissed Carol Harwell to the Presbyterian Church at Butner, N. C. and Mrs. Joyce Ferrell Burris has been transferred to the rolls of the West Avenue Presbyterian Church in Charlotte.

The Senior High Fellowship, under their new adviser, Terrell Hall, celebrated Assembly's Youth Sunday by conducting the morning worship while the minister joined his family in the congregation. Talks were made by President Dickie McKenzie, Vickie Brafford, Jim Bunnell, Richard Blackburn, Jean Murdoch, and Jackie Taylor. Julia Clendinin played the organ while Graham Blake, Shirley Faulk, Donna Edmisten, Patsy Ross, Randy Shaw, and Martha Trivette led various parts of the worship service. The theme of the service was "Witnessing For Christ" and the speakers chose different phases of life to illustrate how a personal witness could be made.

The Pioneers under their new leader, Mrs. J. W. Crews, are making plans to entertain their friends from the First Presbyterian Church in Statesville, and are looking forward to a Conclave in April with other Pioneers of the Presbytery.

Be sure to read the new bulletin boards next time you are under the steeple, and remember, wherever you are, to read the Bible daily. "And you shall be my witnesses . . . to the end of the earth."

## Annual Physical Exams Conducted By Doctors

During the month of January the annual physical examinations were conducted for every child on the campus. Doctors Lafferty and Sinclair had only a few minor recommendations for follow-ups subsequent to the examinations. Dr. W. T. MacLauchlin who has been rendering this service to the Home for more than ten years was unable to arrange his schedule for the trip to Barium this year. In his place came Dr. Carter Sinclair. He, with Dr. John Lafferty who has been coming for nearly ten years, declared after the day was over that the health of the boys and girls was much above the average of any similar group which they had seen or known. Each year these doctors comment particularly on the dental work that is being done, saying that they see very few who have work equal to this and none superior to the quality of the dental work being done for the boys and girls at the Home.

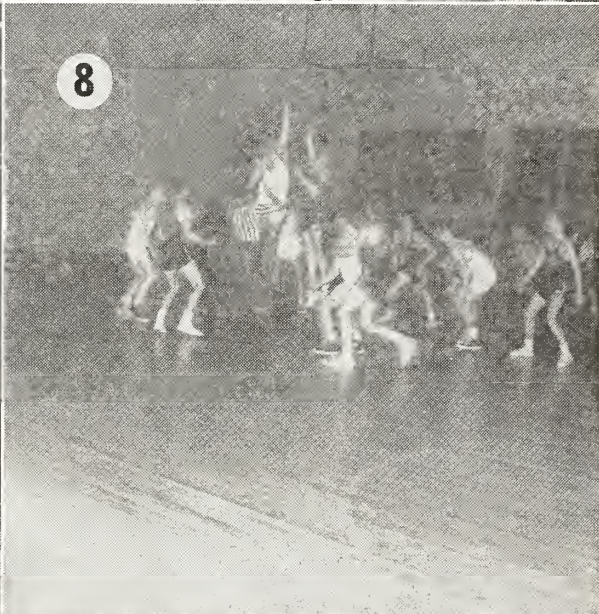
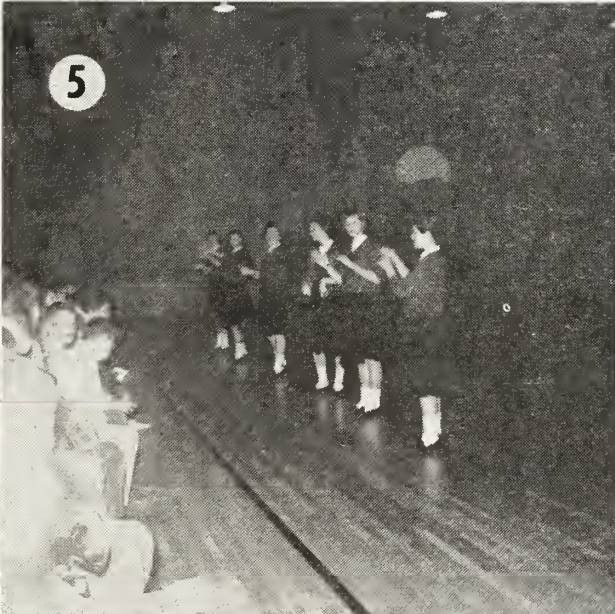
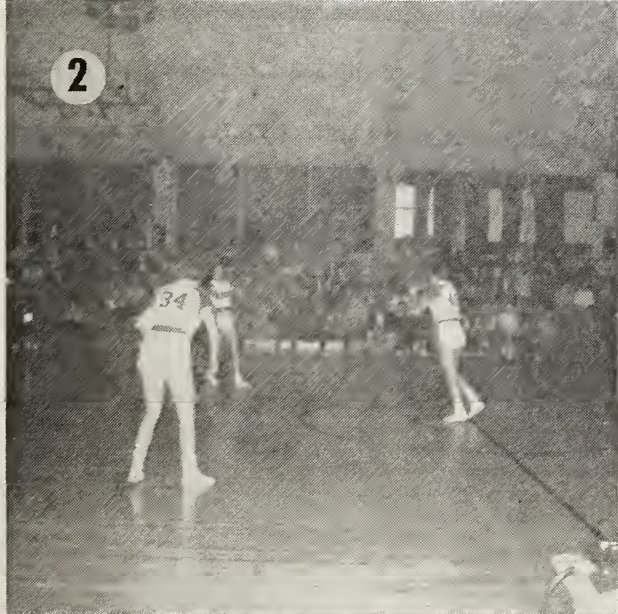

# What We Expect Of Houseparents

By ALTON M. BROTEN

The position of houseparent has grown in stature during recent years. Particularly today a great deal of emphasis is being placed upon the importance of our institutions' being staffed by able persons in these vital spots. The ability of the houseparent to do the job that is being cut out for her depends largely upon personality and training.

What are we asking of the houseparents? These are some of our expectations:

Take direct responsibility for a group of children, usually unrelated, who come from a variety of situations and for whom the future holds a variety of possibilities.

Provide and maintain an organized, though relaxed, cottage which embodies many homelike qualities and allows for the healthy development of each child.

Come to an understanding of each individual child within the cottage, of his background, of his immediate adjustment, and of the planning under way for his future.

Help to guide the progress and development of the group itself so the life together will work for the benefit of each individual youngster.

Provide for the physical care of each individual child.

Be ready to meet each child's "hour of need" by listening, or counselling, or supporting. Know where to go for help or where to secure help for the child.

Accept parents and relatives, even though they have rejected the children and do not share one's own standards.

Be willing to devote oneself to the job without losing one's own personal identity, complete with outside interests and activities and fresh approach to daily living.

Recognize the professionalism of the position, thus being able to share confidential and meaningful information and ideas, being able to recognize the purpose of other positions, and being able to participate in a team approach.

Come equipped with physical stamina, patience, sensitivity, intelligence, and a sound philosophy of life in order to be firm, consistent, kind, and a living model for children to follow.

Be able to find personal satisfaction in the position without becoming overly involved. Find enjoyment in most of the daily experiences. Do not find it necessary to over meet own emotional needs through relationship to job or to children.

Find satisfaction in working and living closely with other adults. Be not inclined to react strongly toward what may be seen as limitations in others.

Assume an optimistic and perspective viewpoint of the program in order to continue consistently day by day to carry through on responsibilities.

Be open-minded and willing to listen and learn and be corrected. Be ready to express own convictions.

Are we expecting too much of an individual in this position? Are we setting our sights too high? How can anyone be a parent, psychologist, caseworker, educator, group worker, spiritual adviser, disciplinarian, cook, housekeeper, nurse, friend, recreation leader and counselor—all rolled into one?

I do not believe that we are setting our sights too high provided we are realistic and thoughtful and farsighted in our over-all program planning. We are not looking for experts in each one of these areas. Rather, the houseparent needs to be someone who is emotionally well-balanced, can live fairly easily with either children or adults, and who is able to grow in overall ability. She must have a certain natural ability and this coupled with training and support on the job can make it possible for her to come up to expectations.

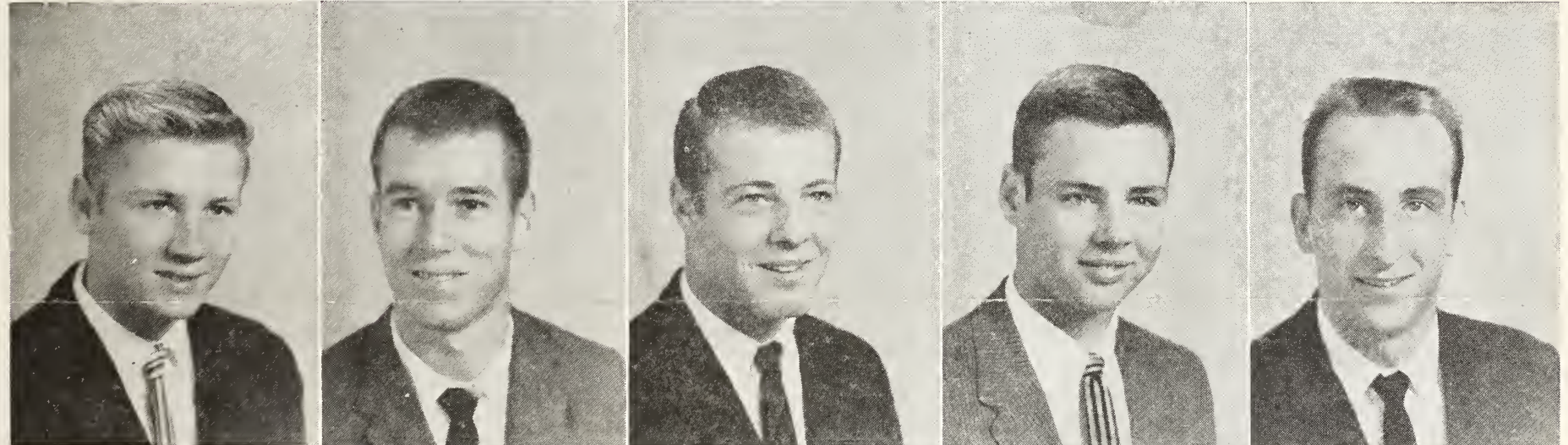

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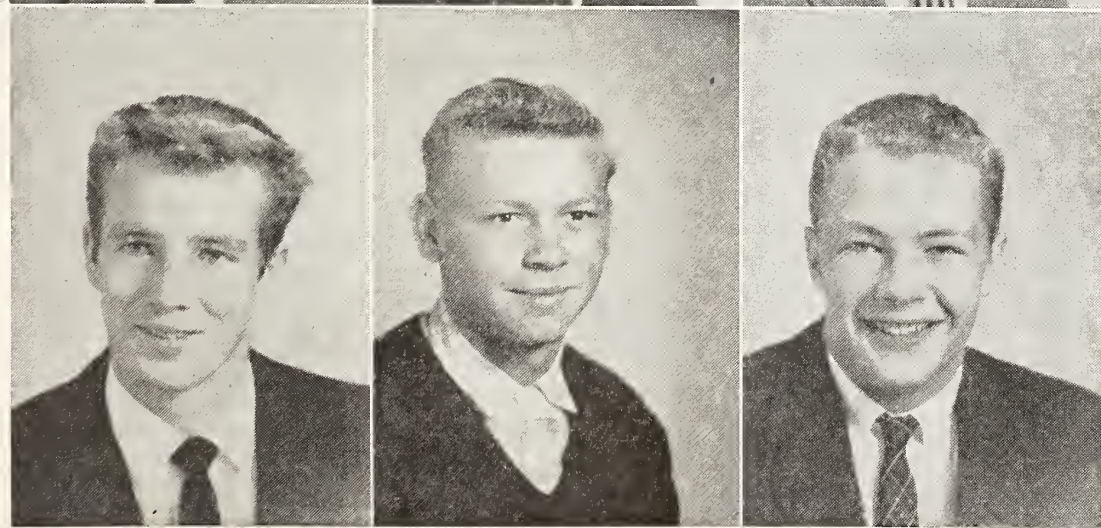

the boys and girls of the Home. An additional recommendation was offered to request the Iredell County Board of Education to receive at Troutman as soon as possible grades five, six, seven and eight of the Barium Elementary School.

The Committee on Finance and Budget prepared and presented a budget for the year October 1st, 1959 to September 30, 1960. This was approved and forwarded to the Synod's Council for its consideration and presentation to the Synod of North Carolina. Special consideration was given to the funds invested by the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company. All of these funds were consolidated into one unit for investment purposes on the part of the Bank, but will retain their identity in the records of the Home. This will enhance the investments and earnings of the funds of the Home.

The Board was generous in its commendations for the children of the Home and for the work of the staff with the boys and girls.

## Summer Program Is Busy Time

When the school doors close for the summer recess, the Barium life begins to hum. It is no easy matter to keep five hundred acres under cultivation, harvesting hay from a hundred of these acres and combining 5,000 bushels of small grain, planting and cutting enough ensilage to fill three trenches, holding all together five hundred tons. Six hundred bearing peach trees must be sprayed regularly, as well as the eight hundred apple trees. The grounds must be cultivated and cared for with the weeds kept cut down. The crates have to be mended and made ready for the summer and fall crop of fruit.

The dairy crew is busy mending fences in the five-mile pasture, looking out for the one hundred head of cattle in the beef herd, and milking the forty-five Holsteins that make up the dairy herd. This crew also has undertaken to paint the inside and outside of the milking barn to meet the top specifications of the County Health Department.

While the farmers are busy trying to kill grass, the campus crew is busy trying to get it to grow, trimmed and looking neat. Shrubbery must be cut back, screens must be repaired, painting must be done, floors must be sanded and fixed, wiring has to be replaced, light bulbs checked, the plumbing lines kept repaired and the sewage disposal system kept running. Of course, these jobs are primarily for the boys and men, but

never think for one minute that the women and girls are not just as busy. Three meals a day to be prepared for this large family and the dishes washed and made sterile, ready to start over again the next day with three more meals. The truck brings the big baskets of clothes into the laundry and throughout the week Mrs. Murdoch and her crew are busy washing and ironing for the family. The sewing room is running full blast to catch up on the needs that were laid aside for the special work on evening dresses for Junior-Senior and commencement, etc., and the machines are really humming. In addition to these, the Infirmary must be maintained, the cottages must be served, and a thousand and one other things seem to come up during the day.

All is not work, for there is time for play. Swimming and tennis, softball and skating, together with the song fests and folk dancing—these plus a little special dating on campus and off add spice to the life of the summer program.

Worship, too, is a large part of the summer at Barium Springs. Summer camps and conferences are open, the Bible School is conducted, special Young People's programs and the regular services of worship through the Church School and Church Services prevail. It is an interesting, busy and wonderful time.

## Barium Springs Elementary School

### Recommended For State Accreditation

(By Mrs. Blanche S. Reitzel, Supervisor Iredell County Elementary Schools)

At the close of the school year 1958-59 Barium Springs Elementary School was recommended to the State Department of Public Instruction for state accreditation. The recommendation was made by C. G. Credle, Superintendent of Iredell County Schools and Mrs. Blanche S. Reitzel, Elementary Supervisor.

The State Department of Public Instruction has set up standards which schools must meet if they are to be placed on the list of accredited schools in North Carolina. Minimum requirements are the same for all schools whether they are in large cities or in rural areas. These requirements are all inclusive because they cover such

things as: organization and administration, school buildings and grounds, teaching materials and equipment, and certification of teachers; as well as the instructional program.

Provision of the school building and teaching equipment is the responsibility of those who provide funds for operating the Children's Home at Barium Springs. The type of instructional program provided is largely the responsibility of those serving on the school faculty. In preparation for school accreditation the faculty devoted a great

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### BARIUM SPRINGS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL RECOMMENDED FOR STATE ACCREDIATION

deal of time to professional study, and to evaluating the total instructional program in the school. The remainder of this article is a summary of their professional study and evaluation.

In evaluating the school program, it was necessary first of all to look at our Philosophy of Education. We believe that:

1. Education should enable a person to make a better living, but should also enable him to live a happier and more complete life through interest in and appreciation of literature, music, art, and religion.

2. Initiative and self-expression should be encouraged and guided into channels of service, co-operative effort, tolerance, and respect for duly constituted authority.

3. Education should be flexible so as to meet individual needs; that is, to help each child to develop to his maximum capacity.

4. Students should be taught to expect change and to adjust themselves to it, to think logically in problem situations; and to form judgments in the light of facts, rather than prejudices.

5. Education should develop ethical character through training in honesty in all school work, fair play in athletics, respect for property, and in an attitude of reverence toward sacred things.

6. It is especially important in our school, that the children be given a feeling of security in the assurance that someone loves them.

7. It is vital to have a maximum co-operative effort by the school, home, church, etc., in order to meet the needs of the child.

In determining the task of the school it was deemed necessary for the school program not only to meet the (Continued on Page 3)

needs of the child but also to consider the society in which he lives. We felt the need of impressing upon the child the importance of learning things in order to be a better citizen, not only in our present community but for future life in any community.

In appraising school living and attacking problems in teaching areas, it was agreed that efforts should be made to work more closely with houseparents and social workers in the guidance and development of our students. Boys and girls need to see and understand the value of their school experiences. More participation and planning on their part would create interest and give them a more meaningful school and home life.

A discussion on resources seemed to indicate that more use could be made of those things about us and that more pupil participation might add enthusiasm. It was agreed that there are many possibilities in our immediate community.

In looking back over our school philosophy and then seeking an evaluation of the growth of a child, it seemed evident that we do not always take all things into consideration. Family backgrounds and emotional situations often cause our children to perform strangely under certain circumstances. Therefore, many things must be considered as we attempt to evaluate pupil growth. At Barium Springs the teachers have frequent conferences with the children and observe their work closely, giving help and encouragement to each individual. A congenial, friendly relationship between members of the faculty makes a healthy atmosphere for doing the best work with children.

We discussed Improving School Living through the School Lunch Program. The need for the development of desirable food habits and good table manners was stressed. Proper training in conversation with respect to topics and tone was mentioned. The lunch period affords further opportunity for proper emotional and social development. Different age groups sit together at the same table, and that gives more of a normal home atmosphere.

The Language Arts are the arts of communication which include: clear thinking, vivid speech, intelligible writing, appreciative listening, reading with comprehension and appreciation, skillful use of books and libraries, correct spelling and legible handwriting. After discussing these areas, the following conclusions were reached.

Listening habits can be improved by opportunities to listen to materials at each child's maturity level, dictation exercises, questions on materials read to group, and effective

oral reading of stories and poems.

Speaking and writing opportunities are given in meaningful situations such as class discussions, stories, programs, Santa Claus letters, and choral reading. Remedial work is based on the child's need.

Spelling is emphasized in all subjects in addition to a daily period. Each child is encouraged to keep his own list of spelling "demons". Much time is spent in developing skills in syllables, sounds, accent, and meaning.

Penmanship is taught in a less formal way, emphasizing correct letter formation and a legible handwriting in all written work.

As we evaluated the arithmetic program, the following are some of our findings: In the primary grades children often have opportunity to use numbers in functional situations. Some of these are operating a play store, observing a clock in the school room, distributing classroom materials, choosing teams and keeping score for teams.

Through the management of the concession stand at athletic events, the upper grades have actual experience in making change, calculating profits, and in keeping records of money spent.

In looking at our science program, it was felt that we might emphasize more and richer experiences for each child. Opportunities should be given to enable individuals to make discoveries for themselves by observation and experiment.

Social Studies provide many opportunities for the children to grow in understandings and skills necessary for effective living in a democratic society. It is important for each teacher to know what goes on in the years below her grade and what takes place in the following grades. One means of achieving effective group living is to have class officers and various clubs. This provides opportunity for the teacher and pupils to work together closely.

We felt most proud of our program when we talked about Physical Education, Health and Safety. Our annual physical examinations and follow-ups, our physical education facilities, and past safety records were reviewed, but we all realized the need for special emphasis on posture, and the effects of our program on out of school life.

Our Music program has been a very satisfying part of our school life. We have almost one hundred per cent participation in our special voluntary choral groups for boys and girls.

Through our art program children are provided ways and means of improving and enriching their lives. They are encouraged to develop a greater appreciation of their

own work and the work of others.

As we discussed each of the various topics we asked ourselves these questions:

1. What are our strengths in this particular area?
2. What are our weaknesses in this area?
3. What immediate plans can we make for removal of these weaknesses?
4. What long-range plans can be made to eliminate these weaknesses.

## BARIUM BOY GETS Ph.D. DEGREE

Pittsburgh, Pa.

DEAR MISS CARPENTER:

In response to your request, there is enclosed a snapshot of myself. Please let me know if this is not satisfactory. I feel rather immodest to parade myself before everyone, but I do believe that my Barium friends are interested in each other's achievements (e.g.—the Starling brothers).

I do not recall writing about my visit with the Alessandrins this past March. Henry and wife had me out to dinner and Victor came over to chat. I was very impressed with Henry's fine-looking, happy family. He is a good provider and is skilled in many ways.

Ginger and I have begun the arduous task of packing and hope to get moved into Buffalo by August 1st. For the first year we will sublet from someone who will go to Europe on a Sabbatical. We drove straight to Buffalo from Minneapolis and then came home, very tired from the three days of traveling. One can now take a fast toll road all the way from New York to the Wisconsin border.

At Buffalo my duties are divided between the Psychology Department and the Vocational Counseling Center there. (Rank - Assistant Professor). I will teach professional level courses in Counseling Psychology to students in the graduate training programs. (Courses in counseling methods, use of tests, and research.)

The Vocational Counseling Center is a very specialized agency which serves the community, plus the more complex vocational-problem students. (Distinct from the usual college guidance center.) We do a lot of diagnostic testing and operate a training program for the graduate students in counseling.

I am not certain if a background note was desired. For the record, I got my M.A. at Columbia in 1951. I then worked full-time at Emery for two years. In 1953 I began studies at the University of Minnesota, although I worked at the same time: dormitory counseling, research fellowship, instructor in psychology. In 1957 I came to Carnegie Tech for two years—while working on my thesis in my spare time. My thesis, or dissertation, dealt with the relation between interest and ability. Essentially, I performed an experiment to see if interests in given activities changed after learning about one's own ability in them and about the ability in them of other persons in the same vocation. The details are quite involved and I will spare you that. The study was moderately successful. One of my professional interests is to study the nature of interests and their causes.

Some Barium folks have asked why I studied at Minnesota. For one reason, the University there has a high reputation in the field of Counseling Psychology. (Counseling Psychology is very similar to Clinical, but focuses more on the educational and vocational problems of the normal person.) A practical reason for going to Minnesota was the Research Fellowship offered me when I applied. Last, but not least, I was eager to visit the State where my mother grew up and taught school. We have several relatives there now. Since Ginger's family lives there, we will continue to return. We regret living so far from everyone. I hope the Alessandrins, for one, can come by to see us.

Again, thanks for your interest in my progress. It is a relief, not to say necessity, to have the doctorate in a college community.

## 850 ATTEND MEN OF THE CHURCH FALL RALLY

### Mrs. Sidney Bost Retires After 15 Years

September brought the separation of Mrs. Bost from her regular station at Barium Springs. For a decade and a half she had been a part of the office staff of the Home. Having come during the administration of Dr. J. B. Johnston, she had kept up the voluminous correspondence in the Western North Carolina's Activities Association as well as the correspondence of the Home. Expert in her work and eager in her desire to have the thing done right, Mrs. Bost brought to the Home a quality of service unsurpassed.

As she reached the retirement age, she made the choice of withdrawing from the staff and taking up her "rocking chair routine" and planned to become a real financier as she invests her social security money.

A successor will be chosen, but no one can replace "Miss Essie B." She has served the church all her life. In her early childhood, she was a member of the Presbyterian Church, then she served the church as the wife of an Episcopal rector until her husband's death. Returning from Durham, she resumed her residence in Statesville and continued her service to the church by being a part of the Presbyterian family at Barium Springs, but continuing her membership in the Episcopal Church in her home community. Barium Springs is grateful for her stay on the campus, for the magnificent way in which she did her particular work, and for the quality of soul that she demonstrated in her dedicated service.

Eight hundred and fifty of them had come from the churches in the Presbytery for a barbecue supper to be served by the students and staff at Barium Springs to be followed by the Fall Rally in Little Joe's Presbyterian Church. As the men entered the big dining room at Rumpel Hall, they were greeted by Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Clendenin at the "cider bar." A hundred gallons of apple cider had been prepared for the occasion and when the meeting was over there was no cider left. Barbecue was served in abundance and 75 gallons of coffee and 720 Coca-Colas were consumed in addition to the milk that was used.

After the supper the men poured into the sanctuary filling the chancel, the nave, the balcony, the narthex, porch and yard for the program that had been prepared by President A. J. Gillespie and his Men's Council. Officers were elected, reports were heard and Dr. George Vick, pastor in Charleston, West Virginia, brought a stirring message to the men. He challenged them to be "God's man" using all their energies in the work of the kingdom of God.

The students and staff of the Home take great pleasure in rendering this service to the church and feel a real sense of pride in being able to put on the table many products that have grown on the farm and in the orchard. During 40 minutes of the heavy serving, 600 men were served, meaning that every 4 seconds a man was passed down the line with plate in hand ready to begin his evening meal.

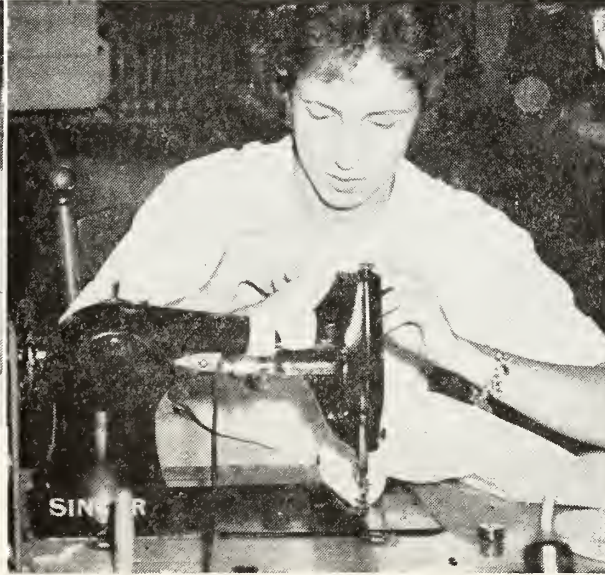

silage for the dairy herd. The center picture shows one of the boys busy with the milking machine. Twice a day, these 45 holstein cows have to be milked and the milk delivered. The Home's milk is traded for the processed milk and returned to the table so that every child can have a quart and a half a day. The care of these animals plus the concern for 100 head of beef cattle and 200 hogs keeps the staff and the students busy. There is a lot of painting and repairing and grass cutting to be done. The boys in the underpass with their paint brushes represent many hours of labor spent on painting the houses and keeping the campus in good trim. Without work to do there is little chance for happiness, but having a share in the program of the Home keeps the boys and girls busy and gives them the feeling of having a part in what is going on.

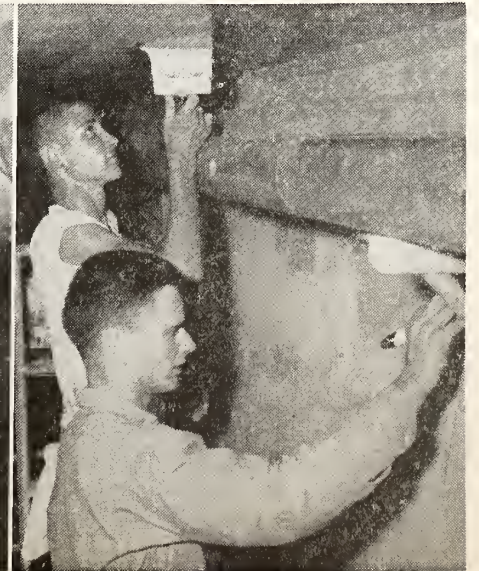
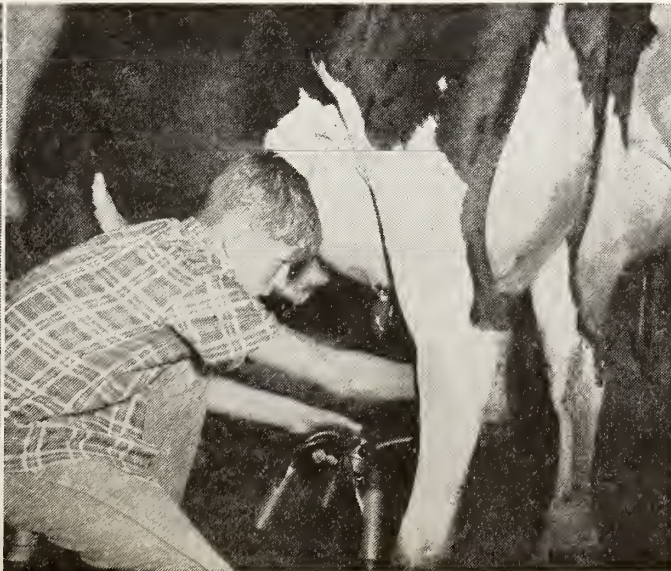
The Singer sewing machines hum in the big sewing room. Under the direction of the supervisor, the girls help in making the dresses and doing the sewing for the whole campus. The big ironing machine shows three girls rubbing out the wrinkles of the clothes that have just been washed. It takes a lot of water, soap suds and elbow grease to get the clothes ready for the boys and girls in the fifteen cottages. These pictures are typical of the life that goes on daily. Girls, also, assist in the cottages, serve tables, wash dishes, help in the Infirmary, and wherever something needs to be done.



Eighteen hundred bushels of peaches were picked, eaten, frozen, or sold and the 800 apple trees ordinarily produce between 3,000 and 4,000 bushels of apples. The boys and girls of Barium Springs have a job to do and they have certainly been busy at it this summer and fall.

The girls are not alone in their efforts in maintaining the operation, for the boys, too, are busy. Two are shown in the picture stacking straw to be used in the lounging barn. This year the farm produced 3,000 bales of straw and 15,000 bales of hay. Three big trench silos have been filled, storing over 400 tons of

# UNDER THE S T E E P L E

## THANKSGIVING 1959



Generosity produces thanksgiving. So we are told in Second Corinthians, where the Apostle writes about seed-time and harvest and the far reaching results of sharing. Notice which comes first: generosity, then thanksgiving.

Somewhere I remember reading a story of a beggar who occupied a certain corner near the center of a small European town. He was despised by the entire township because of his nasty disposition. No matter what was tossed into his ragged cap, the ill tempered fellow cursed and swore and sometimes spit upon those who had meant to show him kindness. No matter what people did for him, he always felt that they should have done more. So he and his benefactors never had a kind word for one another.

Finally, a wealthy man adopted the offensive beggar, took him to his magnificent estate nearby, housed him in a pretty little cottage, and provided him with daily meals. Some months later, the townsfolk

witnessed a noticeable change in the beggar. They could hardly believe that he was the same man. His facial expression was kind. He was soft spoken. He, of all people, had mellowed!

At last they learned why. Off in the steep hills during one of his lonely wanderings, the beggar had found an injured goat. He had carried the goat back to his cottage to care for it. He had fed the goat from his own table, at times giving it his entire meal. For the first time in his life, the beggar had been generous. For once, he had deprived himself of something in a sacrificial way. His own generosity had given him a thankful heart.

This little story does not illustrate the Scriptural text except to point out that generosity comes ahead of thanksgiving. In the case of the ungrateful beggar, it was his own belated generosity that produced his own belated thanksgiving. The Corinthians on the other hand, were told that their generosity, administered by the Church, would produce thanksgiving in

the life of other Christians who, for the time being, were dependent upon the generosity of the more privileged.

All of which is to say that the traditional football games, and roast tom turkey with cranberry sauce, and gatherings of the homefolks, and even the traditional church-going—these ways by which we celebrate and enjoy Thanksgiving Day—do not PRODUCE Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving comes AFTER generous giving.

Long before Governor Bradford of Massachusetts and his colony of Pilgrims made their way to a rough hewn church to give thanks to a gracious God, a man raised this question in the secret place of his own heart: "What shall I render unto the Lord for all his benefits toward me?" (Ps. 116:11) And here is the way that he answered himself: "I will offer to thee the sacrifice of thanksgiving . . ."

Generosity that is born of sacrifice will produce Thanksgiving for you and me.

## A BOY AND THE CASEWORKER

"Could you help us?" asked the minister in a letter. A small boy and his mother had come to the office of the pastor seeking help. She found herself unable to care for the child and turned to the Church for assistance. The minister in turn sent a letter to the Home to see what the possibilities were for entering the child. The Caseworker then answered the call and began the contacts. She found a thin, little fellow, rather tall for his age, and with unusually keen eyes waiting to see what would happen. She told him the story of the big place at Barium Springs with all the boys and girls—how he would be eating in the dining room with several hundred people—living in a cottage with a group of boys and a housemother—as he grew he would have a chance to work on the farm and play football. His eyes got bigger and bigger and he seemed to tug just a little closer to his mother's skirt. The only solution, though, was the big, new home and the little fellow joined the big family to be a part of Barium Springs.

It seemed from the very start he had some inner resource that made him determined to stand on his own and make the group take notice of him. He grew along through the "snaggled tooth and stumped toe" days and on to putting on his football suit to be a part of the junior team. The backfield was his choice. He wanted to carry that ball. When the opposition was takled by this lad, the ball carrier knew he had been hit. That thin frame grew taller. The muscles grew stronger and the mind continued to do its part

for the grades from early grammar school were at the top of the class.

The high school found a tall, clean-cut, clear-eyed boy beginning his studies and his varsity athletic program in football and basketball. There was a dream in his mind that some day he might receive an appointment to the Air Force Academy. To that end he would work hard. The body was kept strong through the sports program and the summer work. Extra-curricula activities included the Beta Club, church choir, etc. Girls, too, were a part of the life of this boy, though he seemed a bit reserved in his relationships to them. Through the first three years of his high school course, he and the Caseworker kept in close touch with his mother and, thus, was enabled to keep well adjusted in the life of the Home.

In the spring of 1959, a new window opened in his life. The director of the scholarship program at one of the outstanding eastern schools came to Barium Springs to explore with this boy the possibility of his enrolling in the school. Questionnaires were filled out and examinations, including the national examinations, were taken and all other necessary explorations were made.

Then came the letter from Phillips Exeter Academy addressed to the boy, saying: "You have been awarded an eighteen hundred dollar scholarship for the purpose of attending Phillips Exeter Academy next year." The A's and A+'s had given him a high rating with the administrations committee and the scholarship committee.

Plans had to be made for this new venture. The consent of all people concerned had to be given, the arrangements at the Home had to be made and the preparations for the new life in Exeter had to be undertaken. The Caseworker and the boy worked together to finish all these. During the summer months, this boy now with the same big eyes, with a strong body, with a keen mind, and with a heart given to Jesus Christ was beginning to wonder about his new venture and to see opening up, possibly, the door to his dream of being admitted to the Air Force Academy someday.

Finally, the day came when the shots had all been taken, the papers all filled out and the boy, with his new suitcase packed and ready to go, met the Caseworker. They loaded up in the car and headed for Salisbury. Having prepared a train schedule, the Caseworker put the boy on board in Salisbury to ride the rails to Exeter to the end of his dream.

Not all the days from the first meeting with the Caseworker until the train pulled out of the station were days of success and glory. There were the times of disappointment and discipline. There were the times of concern and counsel. There were the days of natural, normal growing, which always has its heartaches as well as its moments of pleasure; but, all put together, make a wonderful story of success for the small lad entrusted to the care of the Home at Barium Springs. This is the work of the Church. This is the work of the Christ.

# THE BARIUM STORY

Seventy-five years ago Barium Springs was a health resort where people came for rest and a drink of mineral water to restore their physical vigor. Today Barium Springs no longer features the water flowing from the spring for those who are crippled in body, but rather a source of healing for boys and girls of the Presbyterian Church who need restoration in body and spirit. The place is home to hundreds of boys and girls every year. This means food, shelter, clothing, dental work, operations, and work and play and worship. It means security where there was none; it means partnership where there are still those who can share in their lives.

The Home is now in its seventh decade, having been established in 1891. Approximately five thousand children have been served by Barium Springs. The present capacity of the Home is 250 children.

Ordinarily, children between the ages of five and twelve enter the Home. If a child is older than twelve, needs to come to Barium Springs, and the Home can meet his needs, admission is offered even to a senior in high school. The boys and girls of the Synod of North Carolina come from the Presbyterian churches or through the Presbyterian churches. The preference of placement is given to Presbyterians and those for whom the Presbyterian Church in the local community is responsible.

What about finances? Do you have to pay? No child is ever accepted or rejected on the basis of his ability to pay or not to pay. The Presbyterians of the Synod of North Carolina through their contributions support the Home; however, each parent or responsible relative who can make any contribution to the Home for the child is required to do so according to his ability.

While the Home becomes the legal custodian, it never becomes the legal guardian. The natural guardian, or the legal guardian appointed by the Court, is someone outside of the Home who is responsible for making decisions in the life of the child. The adminis-

tration of the Home will make all decisions pertinent to the child while he is in the custody of the Home, but decisions that pertain to his life, other than its relationship to the Home itself, are made jointly by the administration of the Home and the guardian who is responsible for the placement.

The time that a child stays in the Home varies according to his needs. He may be in the institution for one or two years or it may be necessary for him to stay until he has graduated from the high school. An earnest effort is made to keep in close touch with the folks outside the institution and if the way be clear, return the child to his own home or community. In the event that this is not possible, he may continue at Barium Springs until he has finished school, and then through the Educational Fund receive help in continuing his education or training.

What is the greatest need that the Home has? Of course, the greatest need the Home has is for the Presbyterians and those who love it to pray for this place, the boys and girls and the adult leadership. Effective service cannot be rendered to these children unless the total Church remembers this work in prayer. Dealing with the spirits of these children is the most important part of the work. However, you cannot separate the spirit from the body, and it is also necessary to eat food and to wear clothes. This support comes through the Benevolent giving of the Presbyterians and interested friends. The Thanksgiving Offering wherein the Synod asks for \$100,000.00 is the main life-line of the Home. The Benevolence percentage given through the Church is the additional portion. These together make up about two-thirds of the Home's needed operational budget and the other comes through the products of the farm, earnings from a limited endowment, special gifts from friends and interested persons.

The reference to money in the preceding paragraph was to the Operating Budget. The capital outlay has

been met by the generosity of friends through special gifts or remembrances in their Wills. Two new cottages have just been completed. They will both be dedicated to the memory of persons who have left money for this purpose. Thus, in life and death, the Lord guides and His work is carried on in the hearts and lives of the children at Barium Springs.

You ask the question—Can I visit the Home? The answer is Yes. Every week there are visitors who come to the campus. It is a pleasure for the whole Barium Family to have visitors come to see us and to have a meal in the dining-room, go through the cottages, and worship in the church with the boys and girls.

What about institutional work and its place in the total picture of Child Caring? Today it is commonly agreed that there is a three-fold work in Child Care. Children are provided for through the means of adoption, by means of foster homes, and by means of institutional care. The Federal and State government, following in the footsteps of the Church, have turned to the care of children through its Department of Public Welfare. But the State, the Fraternal organizations, and the Churches all together have not yet met the needs of children, and there are hundreds of children still who are standing in need of that which these three agencies have to offer. In North Carolina there is a fine cooperative effort on the part of the denominational, fraternal, and state agencies in rendering services to the children of this area.

A note came to the business office of the Home saying, "I have just been watching my little grandchild enjoy a new red wagon. I am enclosing a check in order that some child at Barium Springs can have the same pleasure." That is the whole story. Men and women who love Jesus Christ and minister to Him through the little ones of this Home are affording opportunity for work and play and worship. It is through such gifts, large and small, that the work of Barium Springs is carried on.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT TO THE BOARD OF REGENTS

The fiscal year October 1, 1958, through September 30, 1959, ended with abundant manifestation of God's having been present during the 12 months as they rolled by. His ministry to the members of this Home and his provisions for the needs of this place continue to be the real cause for Thanksgiving.

### SOCIAL WORK

No person connected with Barium Springs has worked more faithfully than the Caseworker.

information, it appears that the admissions are beginning to level off and that the next years will see a continued enrollment of about that which it is now. The space of the Home could be filled in thirty days if all the applications received were admitted. However, the administration is still admitting only those who are a part of the Presbyterian Church directly or indirectly and who have the full approval of the local Presbyterian Church in the community from which the application comes.

### SCHOOL

May, 1960, will complete the first full High School cycle in the consolidated school. This year's Seniors entered as Freshmen at Troutman and have received their entire High School course in the new setting. The principal and teachers of the school give good report for the Barium boys and girls in their relationship to the school in its various activities. The transition has been much better than we had anticipated and, therefore, more firmly convinces us that it was and is the correct procedure for the Home. It still will take some time to find how best to meet the needs of the boys and girls in this broader and new relationship to the outside community and we in the Home are still working hard to discover them.

As for the elementary school, a portion of the principal's report will serve to describe the procedures:

"The 1958-1959 school year closed May 18 with one hundred twenty-five students enrolled. Forty-five made the Honor Roll for the year and only twelve were not promoted. We had a very good 98.6 per cent in average daily attendance for the year. The 1959-1960 session started with one hundred eighteen enrolled at the end of the first month and a flashy 99.7 per cent attendance mark.

"Our Music Department has continued its good work in both piano and choral renditions during the past year. About forty students were presented in two piano recitals while the different choirs have done excellent work in Church and Chapel performances. The rhythm band was outstanding during the past year with the primary grades showing marked enthusiasm. Many boys and girls were given an opportunity to 'lead a band'.

"There was some improvement in the school curriculum activities. More remedial teaching was done and a project of tutoring in the eighth grade math class proved to be very valuable. Various field trips during the year were most beneficial as this type of teaching has a definite part in any school program. All requirements for full accreditation (Continued on page 2)

Troutman school next year. This decision had its effect on the life of the campus and the change-over has demanded a great many new ways of doing things and the necessity for continued new planning. Such plans and procedures always have their moments of anxiety. As the year closes, your Superintendent can see no reason for regret for the major decision but still considers it to be the right path for this institution to follow.

The discussion of the various phases of the work of the Home with additional comments at the Board meeting and the recommendations that must be presented will give a picture of the operation of the Home.

### RELIGIOUS LIFE

Religious nurture has been and still is one of the major reasons for the Home's existence. It is our business to see that these children are "brought up in the admonition

Carter, Jr., the minister, and the Superintendent are working together to see in the new set up that provisions can be made through the Church and Home for adequate religious instruction and leadership. pertain normally to this department, there have been added many other valuable things to be done which are time consuming. There is enough work to keep four persons busy. The Casework Committee will report that our enrollment for the year is anticipated to be about two hundred, with about one hundred seventy-five on campus at the present time and new applications pending. For the last ten years, there has been a steady decline in institutional enrollment in general. A large institution in a nearby city has dropped from four hundred twenty to two hundred eighty. All farmers in this section have been talking about the weather since mid-summer. Certainly, it was a good hay crop year because the steady rain kept the grass growing. While the Farm Committee's report will perhaps reveal the work of the farm in detail, let it be said here that the farm had a record year in some production and was down in others. Nearly ten thousand and bushels of small grain was produced, which is a record, and about fifteen thousand bales of hay and three thousand bales of straw, also, are a new high for the farm. In addition, the three trench silos were filled with silage amounting to

something over four hundred tons of silage for winter feeding. The peach crop was up some this year and the apple crop was reduced almost two thirds by reason of trees not blooming and cold weather getting into the orchard in the early spring. There will be plenty of apples for winter use, but the income from sales will not be realized this fall. This lack of income will be reflected in the next fiscal year's report. The dairyman, Arthur Hanks, who had been with the Home for six years resigned and a new dairyman, Mr. W. A. Gibson, was employed. A correct program has been planned and is now being pursued. The gardens produced vegetables for the table and for canning and were delivered to the kitchen according to plans made by the dietitian and the farm manager. The hog barns have been built, though not entirely complete yet. The beef herd, from the one cow and two calves of a few years ago, now has reached one hundred—made up of black Angus and White-face Herefords. It is believed that this number is ample to supply the table with beef for the children's diet. The farm manager, Mr. Roger Murdoch, has had only one year in which to orient himself and the second year should prove in which direction the farm will go under his leadership.

### CAMPUS MAINTENANCE

A thirty-five acre campus with more than three dozen buildings requires time and money, particularly when the buildings are old and tremendous in size. The great struggle with the elements at times seems to our distance the forces in the fight against erosion and depreciation. Mr. Ervin, the superintendent of this department, reports that the sewer system and septic tank are functioning well; that the water system continues to be a problem; that the heat from the central heating plant has been satisfactory during the year; and that the electric lines on the campus have been maintained. He believes the buildings in the maintenance program are about par though there are many repairs yet needing to be done. None fall in the emergency class. Bathrooms have been installed in Lottie Walker, painting has been done in various buildings inside and out, kitchens have been overhauled in campus dwellings and many accomplishments have been made which can be noted by the Regents. Furniture has been put in the various cottages where it was so sorely needed. This program will continue through the coming year until the interior of Howard and other cottages has been made satisfactory and new furniture has been placed.

The Board should carefully consider the proposal of the City of Statesville for bringing a water line to Barium Springs and then the laying of a new water line to the domestic buildings on the campus.

The plans for the new buildings recommended by the Superintendent have been sketched by the architect and will be reported by the Buildings and Grounds Committee for the action of the Board.

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have been used during the year for the boys and girls. Also, there has been the work of the dentist twice a week in the dental program, including orthodontia. It can be said again that no more consecrated Christian service has ever been rendered to Barium boys and girls than that which is being done by Dr. Smith Kirk. His work in orthodontia and in general care of the teeth manifests a competence and a consecration unexcelled. The general health of this campus is good and for that we are profoundly grateful.

Annual physical examinations were held. Regular shots were given—polio, typhoid, tetanus, and others that are recommended for the health and well-being of growing boys and girls.

### FINANCES

The Finance Committee and members of the Board have copies of the auditors report for the year. The Treasurer will be requested to make a statement to the Board and be available for questions and answers as the Board may wish. Through these, it will be discovered that the Home operated without debt during the year within the budget prescribed by the Board of Regents. The Treasurer's report will show that certain memorial gifts were received through wills. The Board will want to take recognition of these and assign them to the particular items for which they have been made possible. It is the intent of the administration to expend the funds entrusted to its care to the best of its ability in meeting the needs of the boys and girls. The best quality and the lowest price is the aim of the Home in its purchasing program.

### CONCLUSION

The operation of the Home at Barium Springs is a tremendous task. The financing of this program takes money. The year's operation in the total life of the Home leaves two firm convictions in the mind of the Superintendent. The first one is that there is much yet to be done to improve the service to the boys and girls of the Home. The second is that the year just closed would warrant the confidence of the Board and the Church in the efforts of the members of this staff in behalf of these children.

Although scores of invitations were received to have children spend Christmas in the home with other families, the boys and girls really preferred to remain on campus in their "second home" in the familiar surroundings with friends, and in the midst of the traditional procedure of the Yuletide season.

Traditionally the season at Barium is wonderful because of the goodness of people. Not a dime is ever placed in the budget for Christmas, and every year the needs and desires of the children are met. Christmas letters written early in November were answered abundantly, and friends, remembering Barium, sent in Christmas money

for shopping, and organizations sent turkey, candy, ice cream and fruit. Churches and individuals brought more than one hundred home-made cakes. Christmas week was begun with the traditional Family Night Supper in the big dining room. The members of the staff and all the members of the Home came together for the supper. In the center of the dining room was erected a beautiful cedar and near it were hanging two big red stockings. In candle light Christmas carols were sung and everyone in the dining room made his way to the big red stocking to take his gift and then to place a piece of decoration on the tree. Seniors presided over the ceremony and when each had made his way by the stocking and the tree, there were \$145 for the children overseas, and a tree shimmering in its beauty. Then with all house lights out the tree was lighted and the Family Prayer was offered.

From then until Christmas morning the excitement mounted in a rising crescendo, so much so that it seemed that we would almost "blast off." Having reached the great day of Christmas everyone rose early and went to the Little Joe's Presbyterian Church for the Christmas service, and then returned to the dining room for Christ-

## BARIUM'S SEVENTH DECADE

Barium's seventh decade fell in the Fateful Fifties. The ten year span has seen a continuation of many excellent procedures and great traditions. It also has seen many changes in the physical appearance and in some prevailing practices.

### PHYSICAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ADDITIONS

Outstanding on the campus are two buildings which have been added in the ten years. The erection of these was the fulfillment of dreams and plans that had been in process for a long time. The beautiful colonial church sits on the knoll at the north end of the campus. It is a delight to the worshippers of Little Joe's Presbyterian Church and to all that pass its hallowed place. At the south end is the Joseph B. Johnston Gymnasium where many hours are spent in happy play and physical development. In addition to these two buildings there have been added four new cottages for children and five dwelling houses for the personnel, one of these being the new manse near the church. The heating plant has been enlarged and the low pressure heating system changed to a high pressure steam line which is used for heating the water in storage tanks in the cottages and for all steam cooking in the kitchen. The sewage line maintained on the campus was overloaded and the tank was inadequate for good operation. The new Imhoff disposal tank was constructed along with an overflow sand bed for the good operation of the system. A lounging barn for the dairy herd and new hog pens farther from the campus have been added to the farm unit. One of the most delightful improvements during the decade has been the paving of the campus roads and the laying of black top walks, thus getting the traffic and the pedestrians out of the mud. The replacement of the worn-out laundry machinery with new equipment and the addition of new machines in the sewing room helps to make these units more efficient. The cold storage unit presented by the men of Myers Park Church is a real asset to preserving foods and supplying the table. The two new hard-surface tennis courts together with other repairs and improvements within the old buildings mark the major items of growth in the physical plant of the Home.

### FINANCES DURING THE DECADE

The income for Barium Springs during the ten years past has been adequate to operate the Home "in the black." This is all the more noteworthy because the one-third increase in budget operations due to the rise in living costs. The income from legacies and special gifts has made possible the capital improvements noted in this report.

One of the primary changes is in the manner in which the operating

money is received at the Home. At the beginning of the decade a great deal of money came directly from Sunday schools, churches and groups and thus a line of communication was open directly from the institution to the contributors. As churches, presbyteries and Synod have moved toward the use of central treasurers the Home now receives the major portion of income from the Synod's treasurer. Through this procedure the Home is unable to know the individual sources from which the money is derived, and thus is lost the happy relationship which existed through correspondence with individuals and local churches.

When in the middle of the decade the new church building was dedicated the memorial fund was continued and made applicable to the educational fund. This, added to educational funds already at hand, assured every boy and girl who completed his stay at Barium Springs an opportunity to continue his education or training according to his abilities and desires.

### MANY CHANGES

The Seventh Decade was one of transition. Primary in this transition is the transfer of the school from the campus to the community school at Troutman. Underlying this move is the fundamental concept that the primary purpose of the Home is to provide homelife, group recreation, and religious nurture on the campus and to take opportunity for normal community relationships through the school program and community projects. The high school began its transfer in the middle of the decade and the elementary school in grades five through eight will begin with its close. This, then, transfers to the community school also the varsity athletic program.

On campus one of the experiments in this transition was the housing of all ages in one cottage and making sixteen the maximum number for any group. This experiment is proving satisfactory and merits the continuation in the new decade.

### DENTAL FACILITIES ADDED

The health program of the Home has always been of major importance and the facilities have been adequate to maintain a high standard of good health. The local physicians, Davis Hospital and the dentists in Statesville have taken care of the Home. During the decade past the Presbyterian dentists of the state became anxious to improve the dental program by establishing on campus a dental office and regular care. These men raised the money, bought the equipment, and arranged with Dr. Smith Kirk to give two days a week to the campus for the care of the children's teeth. During this process Dr. Kirk took the required work at the University of North Carolina

for the practice of orthodontia. Now the children of the Home are getting expert care in their regular dental program and orthodontic treatment also. In addition to the superb dental care afforded Dr. Smith Kirk manifests the very highest in the spirit of devotion and consecration and in his love for Barium Springs in every phase of its activities.

### ENROLLMENT

There was a time when the church almost alone offered services to children through its institutional care. Today this is not the case, for there are many agencies rendering service to children, and more children are receiving care and better care today than ever before in the history of child care. Due to the increased interest on the part of county, state, and federal governments and improved programs of adoption and foster home care, the demands for institutional care have not been as great. In line with the national trend the enrollment at Barium Springs has been reduced by about one-fifth. The forecast for the next decade by an outstanding leader in the national picture is for a leveling off at about the present enrollment.

Ten years of group living in the Home can be better seen in terms of the days of care. The total days of care of children with all their love and laughter, work, sorrow, and play is 778,870. Many children who have been a part of the Home have not finished school, but 135 have finished high school, going on into further training, education, military service, jobs, and the establishment of homes.

### The Presbyterian Orphanage

The Board of Regency met in the Y M C A Hall, Charlotte, North Carolina at 3:00 p.m. and was opened with a prayer by Rev. W. R. McLelland. Present were Rev. J. Rumple, D.D., Rev. D. I. Craig, Rev. W. R. McLelland, Rev. William E. McIlwaine, Honorable A. Leazer, S. H. Wiley, John E. Oates, and George E. Wilson.

The Board was reorganized by the election of the following officers:

The Board resolved to purchase Barium Springs property in Iredell County at the price of \$1000.00 from the Trustees of Davidson College and to place the property in a suitable condition to receive inmates, and as soon as this is done, will remove the Home from Charlotte to that place. It was further resolved that the title to this property and any other property which may be necessary for the use of the Home, be taken in the name of Rev. J. Rumple, D.D., the chairman of the Board, to be held in trust by him until the Board is duly incorporated by the Legislature of North Carolina. The Board agreed to accept the option on a lot of land offered by Mr. Schofield of Davidson College.

The purchase of additional lands for the Home was left discretionary with the Executive Committee. The chairman of the Board was authorized to advertise for applicants for the position of Superintendent of the Home, and that such applications be made to him, to be laid before the Board at the next meeting, when an election for superintendent will take place.

The Executive Committee was instructed to notify the matron and lady manager of the Home that the Institution would not be moved until January 1, 1891, and to request their co-operation until the

removal takes place. The Secretary was instructed to publish a notice of the collection on Thanksgiving Day in the North Carolina Presbyterian, and to send a card to every minister and vacant church in the Synod of North Carolina. The Board took a recess to meet today at Barium Springs and will hold its regular meeting in Charlotte on Thursday, December 18th, at 3:00 p.m.

### A Superintendent For The Orphans' Home To Be Elected

Public notice is hereby given to the Regents of the Orphans' Home of the Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina to meet in Charlotte, North Carolina, on Thursday, December 18, 1890, for the purpose of electing a superintendent for said Institution. The undersigned, chairman of the Regents, will receive applications and recommendations for persons suitable for the position, whether laymen or ministers, and will lay them before the Regents for recommendations. ### Barium Springs

(Correspondence of the N. C. Presbyterian)

As the Orphans' Home of the Synod of North Carolina will soon be transferred to Barium Springs, doubtless many of our good Presbyterian people would be glad to hear something of the whereabouts and surroundings.

The Regents of the Home visited the place in a body yesterday, and were surprised and delighted, after a thorough inspection, at finding such a beautiful and salubrious situation, such a convenient and comfortable building, and such attractive surroundings. It is situated on an elevated ridge in Iredell

County, four miles south of Statesville, North Carolina, and to the westward and northward are visible several blue mountain peaks, suggestive of those summer resorts where so many seek climatic reinforcement in the dog days. The name describes a certain spring, near the home, once called the poison spring, now called the Barium Spring because it holds a quantity of carbonate of Barytes in solution, a powerful curative for many diseases.

The Home Property is situated on the A. T. & O. Railroad with a depot and post office in a few hundred yards, where trains from Charlotte and Statesville stop four times a day, and passengers from either of these cities can go and return the same day by train. The neighborhood is thickly settled with well to do farmers, a mile and one-half down the railroad is Troutman, a thriving village of say, one hundred and fifty inhabitants, a Presbyterian, a Lutheran and a Methodist church, two resident physicians, post office (a few words not legible). The Springs just in the rear of the property, and to which we have free access, contains besides the Barium Springs, five or six others, such as White Sulphur, Red Sulphur, Chalybeate, Magnesia, Alum, all nicely fixed up, and occupying an acre or more of enclosed lawn and terrace.

The "Home" itself was built four years ago as a hotel for the Springs, but proved a financial failure, and it fell by mortgage into the hands of the Trustees of Davidson College. Though the property cost the original owner about \$4000.00 it has been purchased by the Regents of the Synod for the small sum of \$1000.00. The building is a neat wooden structure of dressed lumber, covered with tin, two stories high and one hundred feet long, containing thirty good sized rooms, with a well of water and several out houses. It is not entirely finished, but about \$500.00 will finish it ready for occupation. In fact, about twenty rooms have been occupied by guests on former occasions. It is situated in a grove of young oaks, on an elevated, breezy situation, and from its doors the trains may be seen coming and going between Charlotte and Statesville. The people say there is no malaria there, and there are no sluggish streams or stagnant ponds

near to generate the poison.

The Regents have taken steps to place the building in repair, secure the necessary furniture, and equip it for occupation about the first of January, 1891. Thus at the expenditure of about \$2000.00 the Synod of North Carolina will have a thoroughly equipped home for orphans. The same accommodations built on a city lot, in city style, would have been a beautiful monument to the liberality of North Carolina Presbyterians, but the monument would have cost us sixteen or twenty thousand dollars. When the sum is provided the monument can be built. Besides all this, all kind of country produce is available in the neighborhood, and the land produces clover and grass of excellent quality. County supplies are from fifteen to twenty per cent cheaper here than in our large cities, while drygoods and groceries are just as accessible and as cheap as in our centers of trade. Statesville is less than an hours drive with buggy or cart, from the Home and experienced traders say that her markets and stores are cheaper than those of large cities. Her ministers, physicians and Christian workers will take a deep interest in this noble charity of the church, while two or three hours on the train will carry visitors from Charlotte, Davidson College, Mooresville, or Salisbury to the Home.

The Synod of North Carolina is to be congratulated on the speedy realization of what seemed two years ago a vague and distant vision, a thoroughly equipped and furnished home capable of accommodating at least one hundred orphans, all paid for and free from debt. Let us render Thanks to God for the signal success of this, and send up liberal contribution on Thanksgiving Day. Of course with four times as many inmates as the Home had last year, it will require four times as much to support the Home. All contributions should be sent as heretofore to John E. We reported 224 members on the roll of Little Joe's Church at the end of 1959. Here is the way that our members are grouped: Exactly 100 of our members are boys and girls of the Home. Of that number 12 became residents elsewhere during the course of the year and have not yet asked for the transfer of their Church letters. 77 of our 224 members are from families who live on the campus and in the community. 19 are serving in the armed forces, and 16 are away at schools and colleges. We have 12 non-resident members. And all of these add up to our 224.

We also reported 22 members received on profession of faith during the year, and 7 being added by certificate. Our Sunday School enrollment is 223, which almost makes us wonder who is the one not enrolled in Sunday School!

We enjoyed being joint hosts with the Home in the entertainment of Presbytery during the past month. We counted 130 representatives here. Sometimes it seemed that Fellowship Hall contained the main meeting of Presbytery.

On Assembly's Youth Sunday, our Senior High Fellowship took the morning worship service as an occasion to come to grips with some hard problems. Speakers chose as their theme "The Issues Before Us" and dealt with their subject as follows: Graham Blake discussed Juvenile Delinquency; Jeane Murdoch took Modes of Communication; President of the Council, Dickie McKenzie, tackled the Racial Problem; Margaret Ramsey and Nancy Joyner spoke on the Cause and Cure of Alcoholism, and Jackie Taylor probed into Communism. In the same service, Linda Byrd led the Invocation, Confession and the Lord's Prayer; Shirley Faulk had the Responsive Reading, Martha Trivette led the morning prayer, Gene Taylor called for the offering and had the prayer of dedication.

The Men of the Church had a large gathering for breakfast on a cold rainy Sunday morning in which Glenn Steele, W. A. Gibson, Donnie Bolton and friend, Bill Smith cooked and served eggs, grits, ham, sausage, biscuits, and other breakfast delights. Our speaker for the occasion, the Reverend Eugene Witherspoon, assistant at the First Presbyterian Church in Statesville, was forced to be absent on account of flu. The men elected Roger Murdoch, Arthur Sigmon and Frank Nance to lead them in the coming year, and planned a breakfast in February to honor our missionary visitor, the Reverend Lardner Moore.

As we enter into the new decade, we are conscious as never before of the limitations imposed upon the mortal flesh by time and space. Even our "sputniks" accentuate the fact that man must be surrounded by conditions found on God's earth in order to live. All of which reminds us that it is vanity to wish to live long while being careless to live well.

This particular banquet has through the years been an outstanding feature of the Scouting program and an occasion of great delight on the campus. From the killing of the pigs for barbeque to the setting of the table and washing the dishes, everybody turned in for extra service and made the Home a vital part of community activities.

## Campus To Get New Water Supply

In addition the source of supply has been diminishing each year for the last decade. It was imperative that a new source of supply be found for adequacy and for taste and the absence of color.

The one good well will be continued for the use of the laundry and the boiler room and for certain campus uses other than domestic purposes.

## Troutman Bid Falls Under 23-6 Assault

SPENCER — Troutman's Bobcats, gunning for a big upset in the Piedmont Conference Tournament here, ran out of gas in a usual third-period lapse and Statesville's Greyhounds, South Piedmont Conference champions, hit their hottest streak of the year to post a 63-40 decision.

Concord and Asheboro shared the South Piedmont Conference regular season title with Statesville and Kannapolis. Concord took an 87-84 win over Mooresville, while Asheboro downed Troutman, 65-53, to gain the semifinals.

It's co-champion against champion in the nightcap, however. Herb Sampsel's Greyhound sextette shared in a four-way split for the South Piedmont honors and gained a 70-58 win over West Rowan in the opener. Winecoff's girls knocked off rival Kannapolis, 54-48, in a hot-shooting encounter last week. They won the North Piedmont Conference title and will put a 15-1 mark against Statesville's 12-2 in regular season play.

The third place period lapse that has plagued Troutman's Fred Shoaf all season came back to haunt him again after his Bobcats had given the Greyhounds all they could handle for the first two periods in a 22-20 tussle.

But Dave Odom's Greyhounds cut loose with a 23-6 barrage in the third period. "It was our best showing of the year in the quarter," Odom remarked after the tilt. Statesville hit on eight of 16 field goals for a solid 50 per cent and had 100 per cent at the foul line in the third period on seven of seven attempts.

Neither club had anything offensively to boast about in the first half. It was definitely the poorest first half in the tournament's first

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round play. Statesville had seven of 33 field goals for 21.2 per cent and Troutman hit seven of 28 for 25 per cent. Had it not been for foul shots, it would have been rough. Statesville hit on eight of 10 in the first half and Troutman counted six of seven attempts.

Troutman's buckled completely in the third period, both offensively and defensively. They bagged only two of 21 field goal attempts and hit on two of eight foul shots during the spree as the Greyhounds rolled up the score.

Troutman had a 5-1 lead after three minutes of action and, with four minutes remaining in the first period, had built up the margin to 8-4. Consecutive goals by John Alexander, Neill McGeachy, Tom McCurdy and Calvin Bryson pushed the Greyhounds out front, 12-8, as the Bobcats hit a four-minute scoring lapse.

Troutman rolled back in the second period behind center Danny Loftin, who sank some of the most uncanny shots in this dribble derby. Three times, the Troutman ace sliced Statesville's lead to two points. The Hounds held a 22-16 lead with 49 seconds left in the half when Loftin drove for a basket and Dickie McKenzie's set shot with eight seconds left cut it to 22-20. Loftin took a futile attempt at the buzzer and the shot dipped in and out from almost a full-court away.

McGeachy and Loftin matched baskets at the outset of the third period for 24-22 before the Greyhounds hit their hottest shooting spree of the season and the Bobcats went sour.

Statesville rolled from a 24-22 lead to a 41-22 margin before the Bobcats scratched the scoring column on Vernon Clodfelter's two foul shots with 1:18 left in the third period. Troutman went five and a half minutes without a point as the Hounds tossed in 17 markers to break the tight affair wide open. John Alexander, Tom McCurdy, Neill McGeachy and Eddie Earle hit consistently for the Hounds during the stretch run.

Earle and Calvin Bryson built the lead to 50-26 at the outset of the fourth period. With six minutes left, the Bobcats had plenty of foul trouble with Jim McAbee, Vernon Clodfelter and Danny Loftin holding four personals each. The Bobcats lost Clodfelter with 2:52 left and McAbee fouled out with 2:45 remaining.

This article was entitled "The Clinically Trained Chaplain in the Child Care Institution."

Mr. Curtis Chapman, Casework Supervisor, Bethesda - Savannah Children's Center, led the two-session institute for caseworkers. Mr. Chapman had his social work training at the Tulane School of Social Work and has had previous institutional experience at Milne Boys' Home in New Orleans, La.

Mr. Hansel Hollingsworth, Senior Consultant on Group Care with the State Department of Public Welfare, Atlanta, Georgia, led the two-session institute for executives. Mr. Hollingsworth was one of the workshop leaders at Chapel Hill last summer.

The closing session on Thursday morning was devoted to the business of the Conference. Plan and consideration was given to the adoption of a constitution. A report was heard from the directors of the Child Care Project, and the Conference concluded with an address by Dr. Alan Keith-Lucas, Director of Group Child Care Project and Professor, University of North Carolina School of Social Work.

## Board Of Regents To Meet In May

The semi-annual meeting of the Board of Regents will take place at Barium Springs on Thursday, May 12. President M. C. Benton of Winston-Salem will be presiding and the other nine men and ten women from the various Presbyteries will be in session to attend to the business of the Home. Two of the primary items of concern will be the preparation of the annual budget which will be presented to the Synod Stewardship Committee and subsequently to the Synod and the annual report to be made to the Synod of North Carolina which will be in session in the middle of June.

# Board Of Regents Hold Spring Meeting

The Regents met in the regular Spring session in the Fellowship Hall of Little Joe's Presbyterian Church, on Thursday, May 12. M. C. Benton, Jr., President, from Winston-Salem, North Carolina, presided with Charles T. Hagan, Jr., Secretary, taking the minutes. Sickness in the homes of three members detained them and three others were out of State.

The Board heard the report of the Building and Grounds Committee as to the remodeling of the Infirmary and the progress on the new staff quarters. Upon a full report from the Architect and the Building and Grounds Committee, it was decided to replace the present Howard Cottage with a new one story cottage to bear the same name. The conclusion of the Committee and the Architect having been that structurally the building was unsafe and it would be inadvisable to spend any additional money to try to restore it and to put it in livable conditions for family style.

The Building and Grounds Committee, also, presented Colonel E. B. Stafford, Engineer from Statesville, who reported on the proposed water line for the campus. Contract having already been let by the City of Statesville to bring city water to the campus, it was necessary to have a plan for the distribution of the water to the whole of the campus. The plan was approved and the Board authorized the Committee to proceed with the negotiation of the contract and the laying

of the lines. The special concern of the Finance Committee in its report was the proposed budget for the new year. The Synod requires that this be adopted in the Spring and forwarded to the Stewardship's Committee for its consideration and presentation to the Synod of North Carolina in its annual session. The Board authorized the Superintendent and Regent Ennis Jackson to represent the Home at the meeting of the Stewardship Committee, and further instructed the Superintendent to represent the Home at the meeting of the Synod of North Carolina.

The Farm Committee reported that it would be necessary to build a machinery shed inasmuch as the snow and ice had caused the tractor shed to fall in during the winter. This was authorized by the Board. Further, the Committee stated that the farm in general seemed to be in good condition, that continued study and planning would be necessary to devise the best means of carrying on the farm program. The opinion was expressed by the Committee that at the Fall meeting of the Board a better opportunity would be afforded to evaluate the summer's program in progress.

# Helper In Recreation Chosen For Summer Program

The campus will be humming again this summer with recreational activities under the direction of Mr. Steele who has been busy all Winter, and also the new helper, Miss Eleanor Shull, who is physical education teacher and girls' basketball coach from East Rowan School. Miss Shull has had several summers' experience in work in other Homes and in other recreational activities. A well-rounded program for boys and girls will be planned and a lot of fun will be provided. In addition to the recreational program in particular, she will be on the campus during the vacation period to assist in whatever service is necessary while the staff is limited. The group will eagerly await her arrival and anticipate a lot of fun in skating, tennis, swimming, badminton, folk games, hikes, picnics, etc.

## SUMMER SCHEDULE IN FULL SWING

The campus is humming with activity from morning 'til night. The program of work and play and worship keeps the folks busy as a bee in a tar bucket.

Mr. Clendenin and his orchard crew have been spraying the peach trees and apple trees and report a good prospect for fine crops this year. It is a real struggle with the insects to keep the trees alive and to keep the fruit from becoming infected.

Mr. Gibson and the dairy crew find more to do than they have time to get done. The forty-five cows have to be milked twice a day, the barns kept clean, the pasture fences mended, and the hay stored when the farmers bring it in. It's a busy time for the dairy crew.

The gardeners with Mr. Frank Nance, have found that they had quite a struggle on their hands. Grass, weeds, and insects seemed determin-

ed to interfere with the production of vegetables for the table and for storage. It appears that this outfit is winning the battle as demonstrated by their strawberries. They have been serving strawberry pies knee deep in the dining room and one week stored a hundred gallons in the freezer locker for winter use. The kitchen crew really did cap and prepare strawberries during the season.

One cutting of hay has already been stored in the barns and the farmers are getting ready for the harvest season of the barley, oats, and wheat. By the time that's in, it will be the second round on hay and so it goes. The insects have been in the alfalfa and it is a real job to keep them from destroying the whole crop before you can get it cut. It is no easy road in contesting the insects on the farm or those that attack the human body. The real strug-

gle in days to come may be a struggle for existence against the insects that seem determined to take over the face of the earth.

The campus crew, under the direction of Mr. Ervin and Mr. White, have been busy putting in pipe lines for water and electrical lines for rewiring. It is quite a job, also, to keep the grass cut on the thirty-five acre campus, paint the buildings, and keep up the repairs.

The boys are not the only ones at work. The girls have taken over the laundry and the sewing room and are carrying on all of that work under the direction of their supervisors, Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Fox. The kitchen crew, the dish hall crew and the dining room gang find themselves at work serving tables, washing dishes, preparing food and keeping hungry folks well fed.

## HIGH SCHOOL WINS OPENING GAME

Troutman's Bobcats have been hungry for victory for a long time.

They feasted last night.

The single-win Bobcats counted a brilliant defensive performance by End Braxton Bridgers and a fine show in Tailback Charlie McLean as they downed Bandys' Trojans 8-0, before a crowd of some 1,300 to open the 1960 football campaign in this area last night at Troutman.

It was an initial victory for Coach R. G. Calhoun, who moved over to mentor the Bobcats this year after many seasons at Barium Springs. It was equally a win for Bill Dulin, Calhoun's assistant, who had handled the Bobcats since inserting football into the Troutman athletic picture.

The Troutman dressing room was bedlam, and deserted.

The Bobcats haven't had any opportunities in the past to whoop it up, but they made up for it last night.

"We looked pretty fair at times. We made a lot of mistakes but they're a hard-working bunch and they looked all right," Calhoun said after the game.

Dulin said to the best of his knowledge the victory was Troutman's first grid triumph since the 1958 season. That year, Troutman won one, tied one and lost seven. That tie came with St. Stephens in the final game of the season and the Bobcats suffered through 10 consecutive whippings last year.

A wobbly punt set up Troutman's TD and Bridgers moved from the right flank into the end zone to nail Ban-

dys quarterback Tommy Raybon for a safety in the fourth period to account for the scoring.

Bandys Coach Frank Eller, who succeeded Terrell Hall at the helm this year after a one-year absence from football warfare, said the Trojans "weren't ready. We let the runner get outside on the reverse and it killed us."

Bandys, a member of the District Seven AA Conference, was nailed for 52 yards lost rushing by Troutman's defensive unit, led all night by the play of Bridgers, and it cut down their net yardage to 39.

Bandys received and their best offensive threat came quickly. Raybon passed to End Wayne Sherrill over Troutman's Edward Barefoot and Charlie McLean that carried for 52 yards to the Bobcat's 15 where he was pulled down from behind. Bandys was called for clipping and

pushed back to the 30. Two ground gainers, coupled with Bridgers breaking through to nail Raybon for a seven-yard loss, found Troutman taking over on downs.

After a punting exchange, Troutman started knocking on the TD door with a McLean-Bridgers pass combination and a fine 18-yard run by McLean on which he simply bowled over would-be tacklers. The drive stalled, with Troutman punting into the end zone.

Bandys tried to drive it out, but were halted. On a fourth down and 22 situation, Raybon went back to punt. His boot was a wobbly one, off the right side of his foot, and took a crazy bounce back to the Bandys 12, from where he had attempted the kick, and Troutman took over, deep in Bandys territory.

Two pass plays and a pair of McLean attempts at the big

Bridgers raced in to throw Raybon for a 13-yard loss moments later on the Bandys three and the Trojans punted out to the 32, with McLean lugging it back 12 yards to the 20.

Fullback Dale Rogers failed to gain on the first attempt, then picked up two yards over right tackle to set up the touchdown play. Wingback Johnny Murdock, a 139-pound junior, raced around left end on a reverse from the 18 for the TD behind good blocking. The point attempt fizzled when McLean fumbled a high snap from center.

Harry Loftin recovered a Bandys fumble at the Trojan 45 to put the Bobcats back in contention late in the second period, with a McLean to Mac Sherrill pass covering 15 yards for a first down to the 24 but time ran out on the Bobcats.

Troutman, after a punt exchange in the third, penetrated to the Bandys 27 where a fourth-down Richard Ward pass was intercepted by Bandys' Mack McCaslin on the 10 and returned to the 24, with a 15-yard personal foul penalty moving it out to the 39. Bandys moved out to the Troutman 43 for a fourth down and five situation and appeared to have a drive going, but again it was Bridgers cracking through to nail Raybon for a seven-yard loss and Troutman took over. Penalties stalled the Troutman bid, and McLean punted, with Bandys recovering a fumbled punt on their own eight.

The Trojans were charged with an offside violation, pushing them back to the three. Raybon attempting to run it out of the end zone, was hauled down from behind by Bridgers, who slammed in from his defensive right end slot untouched, for a Troutman safety to push the tally to 8-0.

Raybon got off a 23-yard run late in the fourth period to penetrate to the Troutman 37, then grabbed three yards to the 34.

From the first play to the last, it was Bridgers' defensive work that stood out. Raybon attempted to go to the air, was nailed by Bridgers, with help from Guard Bob Ramsey, for an 11-yard loss on the final play.

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## LIFE IN THE BIG FAMILY

The summer was a busy one! The farm, dairy, orchard and gardens kept a large crew of boys busy. It is a man-size job to harvest the 8000 bushels of grain and 15,000 bales of hay, 400 tons of silage, the corn and vegetables from the gardens, peaches from 600 trees and apples from 800 trees. The campus had to be kept, the painting and repairing had to be done and the boys were busy as bees. The girls, too, had their hands full in operating the laundry, the sewing room, dining room and kitchen, infirmary and work in the cottages. All was not work, for there was a great deal of play. Under the direction of capable leaders, planned recreation was provided for every age all summer long. The work of the church was carried on in full force. A large number of Senior High boys and girls attended the camp along with twenty-four Intermediates who attended their camp. Bible School for two weeks was held in August.

The opening of school brought about another change. The high school had already been transferred to Troutman and grades five through eight joined them in going to the consolidated school. County buses pick up the children, transport them to the school and return them at the close of the day. This leaves only the primary school on the campus. Grades one through four are taught in combination grades by Miss Mary Faye Stevenson and Mrs. A. M. Calhoun. This

continues the pattern recently established of bringing the life of the Home into the Community and the Community into the life of the Home, thus making for a more normal growth in the life of boys and girls at Barium Springs.

Three wonderful things were scheduled for the campus for the summer of 1960, two have become a reality and one is scheduled to be ready for spring 1961. Housing was needed for the staff members who were not a part of the cottage life. Men and women who have served the Home long years had done so in small and cramped quarters with no privacy and no adequate bathroom facilities. Apartment units have been erected and these folks can now have a very fine apartment in which to live and to serve the boys and girls of the Home. The second item was the coming of city water to the buildings. For years Barium has been tormented with water from red wells that has ruined all fixtures in every building. Pipe lines have been clogged up and water has been rusty red. The city of Statesville agreed to lay a line to the Home and Barium Springs was to lay the line on the campus. So, through the special receipts from a legacy the dream of many years was realized in bringing a clear, good tasting city water to every cottage. The third item, and a very exciting one for the boys and girls is a new

tional care; Social Security income has enabled many parents to keep their children at home who would have otherwise had to be ministered to in some form of care away from home. Thus, Institutional enrollment in the last ten years has been reduced. The outlook for 1960-61 at Barium is about two hundred children.

The primary source of income for the Home is the Thanksgiving Offering and the regular benevolence percentage that comes through the church. Each year a budget is carefully worked out by the Administration and presented to the Board of Regents for its consideration and approval. No expenditure can be made without the authorization of the Board. This budget then with the Home's request from the Synod is presented to the Council of the Synod of North Carolina and, subsequently, to the Synod. Each year a professional firm audits the accounts of the Home and makes its report to the Board of Regents. Thus, it is the belief of the Administration that the business operation of the Home is done in good and proper order.

All new buildings have been built in one story fireproof style, providing rooms for children to live in and, also living rooms and dining rooms and kitchens for the use of the cottage. While the central dining room still prevails, Saturday night and Sunday night suppers are always eaten in the cottages as well as other special snacks on occasions. The cottages are built so that they could be self contained if the central dining room is ever discontinued.

Not more than sixteen children are housed in a cottage, and these children range in age from the first grade to the senior year in high school. This new plan on the campus at Barium is proving to be very helpful and satisfactory. The boys have been assigned to cottages near the girls cottages, so that they can play together on the campus and move to and fro in normal mixed relationships, thus, reducing many of the hazards that come from unnatural separation. These two procedures have helped to lessen the tensions that existed and have brought about a more wholesome life.

The health of the campus has been good through the year, though there will be more children's diseases as the boys and girls attend public schools and bring back to the campus the things that are picked up. An excellent dental program prevails on the campus. An expertly trained dentist and orthodontist operates on the campus and the teeth of the children of this Home are better cared for than the average teeth of any children in any community in the State of North Carolina. The Infirmary meets the campus needs; Davis Hospital provides hospitalization and Doctors Griffin and McLain in Troutman are on call for the children. Regular meals, regular sleep, work, play and worship help to make for a healthy campus.

The Presbyterians are in business for the church at Barium Springs, investing in the lives of boys and girls in order that they might become good citizens of the State and of the Kingdom. The Home has many needs—additional equipment, buildings to be replaced, paving on

the campus, restoration of fences, for additional personnel, and for funds to adequately pay properly trained people to serve the Home. Barium Springs needs the prayers of all the Presbyterians and many who will remember the place. Let no one be deceived by any false rumors or reports about Barium Springs having plenty and that whatever is needed someone else will provide. The work of this place will not go on unless all the members of all the churches continue to remember the Home and to make contributions for its work.

## Unique Poem on Lord's Prayer Found On A Battlefield

A composition, into which the unknown author uniquely fitted the Lord's Prayer, was found on a battlefield in South Carolina during the Civil War by a brother of Mrs. S. B. Helmer, of Kendallville, Indiana. Through an old comrade and very dear friend, a copy of the prized poem came into the hands of Major John W. Russell, of Denver, who loaned it to the Post.

Major Russell values this composition very highly, not only because of its historic features, but also on account of its worthy and beautiful sentiment.

The original of this poem is printed on heavy satin, and is regarded as a literary curiosity. It bears the interesting date of July 4, 1823.

"Thou, to the mercy-seat our souls doth gather,  
To do our duty unto thee .....

our Father,

To whom all praise, all honor, should be given,  
for thou art the great God .....

who art in heaven.

Thou, by thy wisdom, rul'st the world's whole frame,  
forever, therefore .....

Hallowed be thy name;

Let never more delays divide us from  
Thy glorious grace, but let .....

Thy kingdom come;

Let thy command opposed be by none,  
But thy good pleasure and .....

Thy will be done.

And let our promptness to obey be even  
The very same .....

On earth as 'tis in heaven;

Then for our souls, O Lord, we also pray  
Thou would'st be pleased to .....

Give us this day

The food of life, wherewith our souls are fed,  
Sufficient raiment, and .....

Our daily bread;

With every needful thing, do thou relieve us,  
And to thy mercy, pity .....

And forgive us

All our misdeeds, for him, whom thou did'st please  
To make an offering for .....

Our trespasses

And, forasmuch, O Lord, as we believe  
That thou wilt pardon us .....

As we forgive,

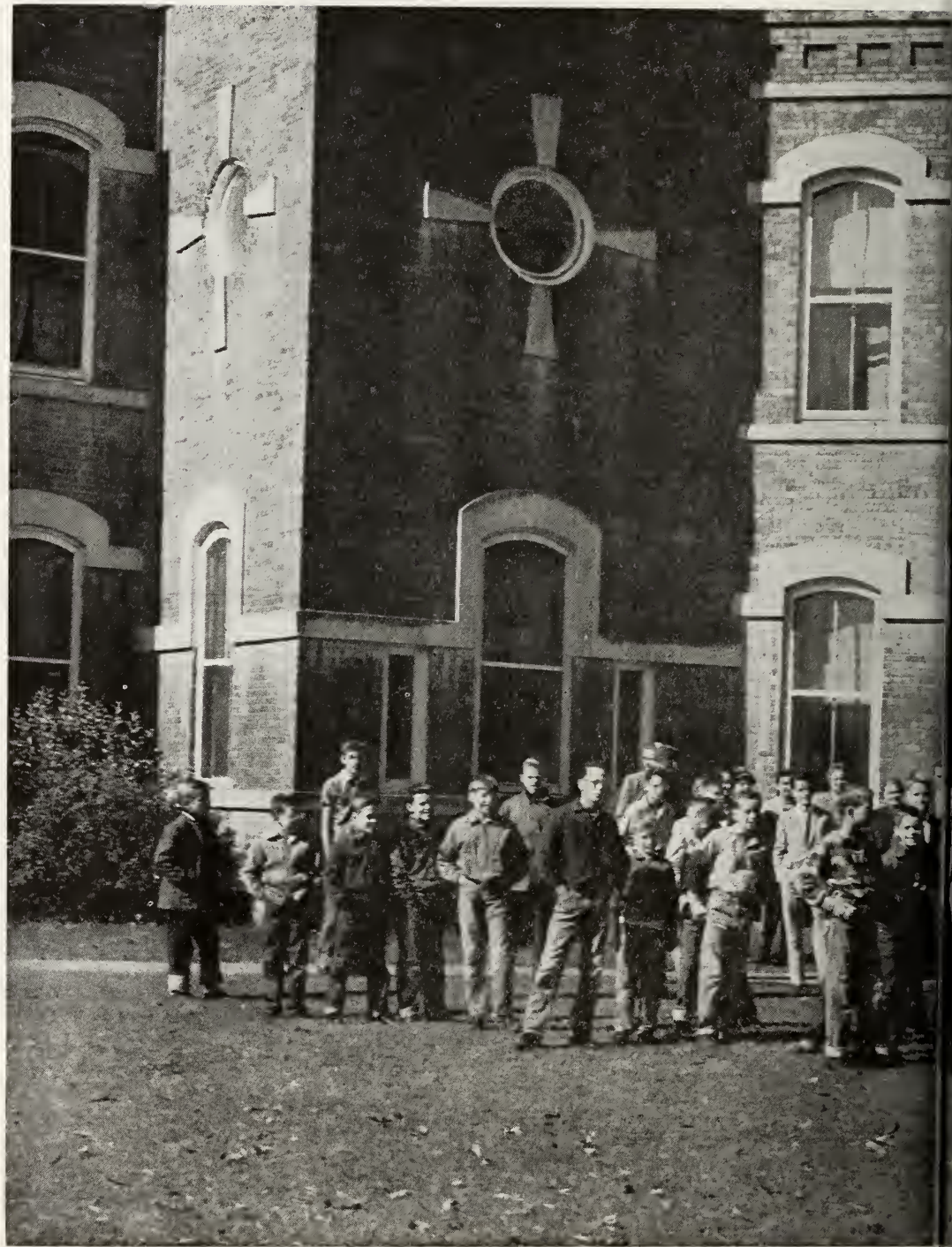

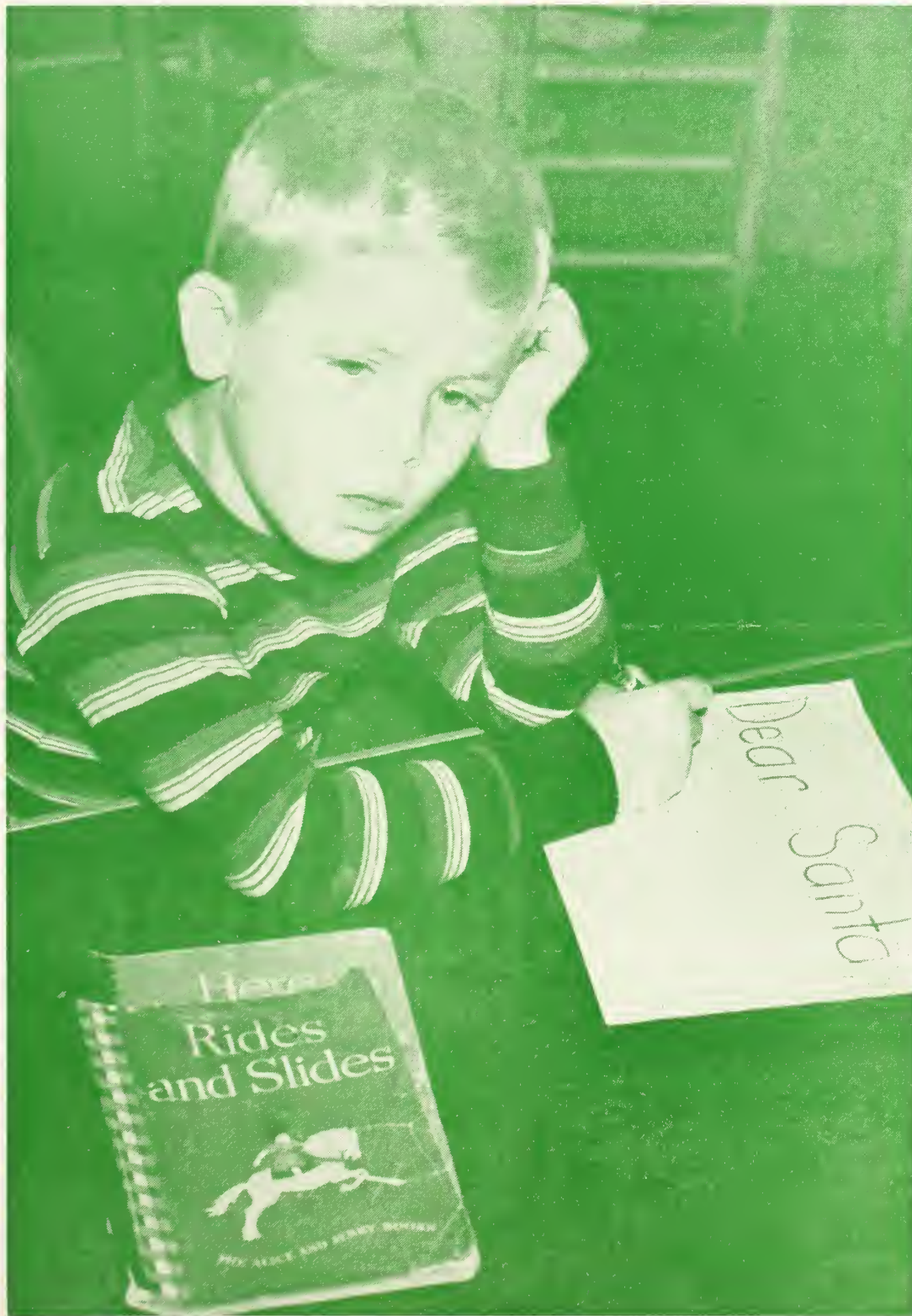
## The Christmas Season Filled With Activities

This is one of the great events that have been in existence here for many long years. The choirs in their work on Christmas music and the Junior Choir in its preparation for the Junior Choir Festival held in Statesville in the early part of the Christmas season, also, are a source of great pleasure, not only to those who prepare and participate, but to those who share in the services of worship. The primary school was given a Christmas trip to Charlotte. The bus loaded at eight-thirty in the morning and rolled into the big city. ## Regents On Campus For Fall Meeting Of Board

The Regents of the Home elected by the Synod representing the nine Presbyteries convened on the campus for the regular semi-annual meeting. The Board received the usual reports from the superintendent and the treasurer of the Home, which review the activities of the twelve months' period and sets forth the financial picture in general.

Mr. Royall Brown, chairman of the Finance Committee, presented to the Board the report of the auditors which showed that the operation of the institution had been within the approved budget and again without deficit. Mr. Ennis Jackson, chairman of the Buildings and Grounds Committee, reported that the staff quarters had been finished and that the swimming pool was well underway. He, then, presented the architects of the J. N. Pease Company who discussed sketches for the rebuilding of Howard Cottage. The Board has authorized the replacement of the old building with a new one-story fire-proof building similar to the two most recently built on campus and continued use of the name, Howard Cottage. The Buildings and Grounds Committee was authorized to make a special study of Rumble Hall and offer some long-range planning for that particular building. Originally, Rumble Hall was a square three-story school building. Later, wings were added to the North and South, enlarging the dining room and making available living quarters on the second floor. To the west side was added a small addition for dish washing purposes and, then, a large brick kitchen was built on to that section. The size, shape, and general condition of this tremendous building make it necessary to give special consideration to it for the best interest of the children in the Home.

Barium apples and cider were made available for the Regents as they left the campus. President M. C. Benton expressed some apprehension lest the officers along the way suspect his colleague Brown from Winston-Salem of being in another business.

One of the most interesting items of business during the session of the Board was the adoption of the new name for the Home and recommending it to the Synod of North Carolina. The name chosen is Barium Springs Home for Children. This will replace the commonly used title of Presbyterian Orphans' Home and the corporate

## Report Of The Superintendent To The Board

For seven decades the loving care of the Heavenly Father has been manifested in the life of Barium Springs. During the seventh decade, I can personally bear witness to the fact that the providence of God has been daily evident in the operation of the Home. The fiscal year closing is the beginning of the eighth decade, and there is every reason to believe that the same divine guidance will continue to rest upon this place if the Board of Regents, the administrative staff, and the children of the Home will continue to turn to Him for guidance.

Three major events have taken place in the work of the Buildings and Grounds Committee. The water line has been completed on the campus and every building now has the use of city water. The staff quarters are completed and four of the five units are now occupied. The swimming pool is in the process of construction and is scheduled to be completed not later than May 1, 1961. These three bring much delight and happiness to the campus and will continue to do so for many years to come.

The Sprunt Infirmary was remodeled during the summer and the elementary school building had many changes made in it. The McNair School building is yet to be changed into a campus center, though some use has been made of it already in its present condition. The winter and spring months will see the conversion of this building to its new purpose. Colonel Norman Pease of Charlotte is the architect to present plans for the new Howard Cottage, and this building will be completed in '61. In the long range planning program, Lees Cottage ought to be replaced and Rumble Hall should be replaced with a modern dining room and kitchen with adequate food storage and distribution center.

The anticipated enrollment for the winter is two hundred children. At present, there are about one hundred seventy-five on campus with applications on file and others yet to be made. This enrollment is in line with the general trend in the United States. For a number of years, there has been a considerable decrease in institutional enrollment. The reason for this decrease is that the institutions are not having to care for all the children. Foster homes, adoptions, and the benefits of social security to families have made it unnecessary for the Homes to take many of the children that ordinarily would have been admitted. At the present time, there seems to be a leveling off, and it is anticipated that the enrollment will be about the same for the next few years unless a depression comes. An additional caseworker has been added to the department.

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## Letter From A Newspaper Editor

DEAR MR. McCLURE:

Thank you for your letter and for briefing me on information about the Homecoming day.

As you evidently know, I am a former Barium boy, but the word "boy" is very much a misnomer. The years long since have caught up with me and now I wonder how long before they overtake me. Altogether I spent five years at the orphanage, four as one of the boys, and one (in 1911) as manager of the printing office.

My first four years there are as clear to me as if I were living them over right now. They were the happiest years of my early life, and they were the most impressionistic. I have never forgotten the things I learned at Barium and never a day passes that I do not feel the wholesome influence of those days.

And somewhere back in my heart there is a constant prayer of thankfulness, uttered without effort, for the Presbyterians of North Carolina and for the people who, by whatever title, staff the Home (now as well as then) for turning misfortune into good fortune for hundreds of kids who without such help would never have a chance to grow into normal manhood and womanhood.

Many of us may have failed to make good—but everyone of us has been given the opportunity.

I learned the printing trade at Barium in the little shop that then was in the basement of Lees Cottage. I followed the trade 12 years and it served me well. It enabled me to pay my own way through Elon College, which I consider one of the best schools in the state. For several years the urge had been building up in me to leave the shop and get into the "front end" of the newspaper business. This I did, with a brief interruption during World War I which I spent on the sprawling hot wastes of Camp Jackson (now Ft. Jackson) in South Carolina. I served on newspapers in Raleigh, Charlotte and Wilmington before joining the staff of Greensboro Daily News. I suppose I am stuck here for life, with no regrets. I have served in every capacity in the news department of the Daily News and now am Sunday editor.

Since leaving Barium I may not have always lived like a king, but because of the Barium imprint upon me for integrity, honesty and modesty I certainly have lived with as much satisfaction as a king.

Four of us Reynolds children spent varying periods at the orphanage. My eldest sister has a wonderful family of four. Her twin boys operate the farm for their father's estate, and one of them was caught in the Battle of the Bulge but survived without wounds. Her two girls are nurses (both anesthetists) and one of them was a captain of nurses with the Army in Europe. My brother now is retired after years with Carolina Power & Light Co. and his wife is a splendid teacher. My younger sister died several years ago after an operation. My wife and I have what we consider the world's two finest girls, both graduates of Greensboro College (that's where they wanted to go, perhaps because of its exclusiveness). One of them is a member of the Daily News staff and the youngest taught in Statesville Senior High School before her marriage in 1957. She now has a little boy six months old.

That just about introduces you to my family, and I'll get back to Barium, and to Rev. R. W. Boyd whom I consider without a peer for saintliness and practicality. He literally gave his life for his orphan household, and denied himself of this world's goods to which he was entitled. For some reason unknown to me he never forgot me. Many years after I had left Barium as a youngster verging on my teens he came to my home in Greensboro. He then was a tottering old man, with a quivering voice. He wept as he embraced me, a man of nearly 200 pounds, and said, "Can this be little Jimmie?" That's what he called me back at Barium. Despite his frailty his mind was clear as he named other boys and girls who were there when I was and expressed pride over the manner in which they were making their way in the world. His thoughts were never on himself but on the boys and girls to whom he had dedicated his life. That was the last time I saw him.

I often wonder what the Orphans' Home would be like today had it not been for his guidance, his self-denial, his remarkable psychology of childhood at a time when child psychology was not given the thought and study that it is given today. I realize there would still be a Barium Springs—great and inspiring and strong—and a credit to the great Church that sponsors and supports it. Mr. Boyd started there with very little, and that, too, shortly after was reduced to ashes. He, with the help of a few other devoted men and women, built it back in brick and stone. The Home itself is a memorial to him—without his name attached to it in any fashion. Perhaps he would have wished it that way.

But some day, possibly, there will arise on the campus a building or something with the name "Boyd" upon it to lend inspiration to generations yet to come. It could be a structure of enduring masonry, but right now my idea of a memorial is a Boyd Memorial Fund, added to from time to time by the alumni (and any others desiring to contribute), the money to be invested and the fund allowed to accumulate over a reasonable period of years before any of the income is expended. We all have seen little things grow great.

Something of the nature as outlined above would be my idea of a suitable memorial—a living thing that would help needy children in future years. There always will be kids

in need of help. To me, that type of memorial would be better than to spend a little amount on some gadget or furnishing that, figuratively, would be here today and gone tomorrow.

Do you think it is worth considering? Or am I a little too ambitious?

I realize the vast majority of alumni never knew Mr. Boyd; some perhaps never heard of him. But during his struggles of the 1890's and early 1900's he was working not only for the boys and girls there then, but for those of future generations. All of us owe him a debt of gratitude.

Another word before I close this too-lengthy letter. Little Joe died in a room next to one occupied by me and three other boys at Synod's Cottage. Oscar Mann (I believe) the day before had brought him down to that room at the head of the stairs on the second floor because it had a fireplace and could be kept more comfortable. Miss Celeste Boyd, who died a few years ago, was matron at Synod's. I shall never forget that phase of my life at Barium.

This letter is personal. I thought you might be interested in hearing from one who lived at Barium at the turn of the century. The place was good then; it is better now, and I am confident it will continue to flourish under your guiding hand.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT TO THE BOARD

Mr. Lofquist will be responsible for the five eastern presbyteries and Miss Carpenter will be responsible for the four western presbyteries. The work with the families of the children, with the children themselves on the campus, and the work with the children in the public schools give more than can yet be done by these two persons. Believing that institutional setting is detrimental to young children, it is hoped that the Board will take action setting the ages of admission to be ordinarily between the ages of five and fifteen years.

The financial picture will be most adequately presented in the report of the auditors, together with a statement from the treasurer of the Home. Let it be said that the Home has operated within the budget approved by the Regents and that all expenditures have been in keeping with the established policies of the Board. The finance committee in its report will present fully the financial picture.

The new venture of having grades five through eight join the high school at the Troutman consolidated school seems good. This change brings about many other changes in the daily operation of the Home and has caused the administration and staff to be unusually busy in setting up a new pattern of life for the campus. This enlarged community living has helped to reduce a good many of the tensions existing on the "closed campus." It affords an opportunity to see the reaction of the children in community life and, also, brings to them many new and happy relationships.

The members of the staff of the Home continue to render excellent service. It is amazing how much work is done by the nearly five dozen people who are charged with the responsibility of the place. Serving beyond the call of duty and investing in the name of the church are the labors of love from those who serve Barium Springs. Securing adequate replacements for those who retire and those who desire to make changes is exceedingly difficult. The Board must continue to give serious consideration to providing adequate salaries for competent personnel of the Home.

The farm with its orchard, dairy, and gardens has produced well during the year. The heavy winter with its snows and bitter cold took some heavy toll in the life of the farm; it, also, brought some advantages. No spring freezes afforded an excellent crop of peaches and a bountiful crop of apples. The small grain yield was lower than last year, amounting to approximately eight thousand bushels. The farm program still needs serious consideration given to it in its various phases. The superintendent has not yet seen fit to expend the sum of five thousand dollars for the irrigation equipment. There is prerequisite planning and some additional preparations before such an investment would be most wisely made. Also, the delay in a report from one of the firms surveying our needs added necessarily to the delay. It is believed that, if State College would do an evaluation of the dairy program, it would be wise to ask for this. When the Home could consume its own production of milk, the savings was considerable. Now, the Home has to meet every requirement imposed on commercial enterprises and, also, has to purchase at the top prices the processed milk consumed by the Home. This makes an entirely different picture for the dairying project at Barium and needs serious study given to it. A new dairyman, Mr. George Smith, has just begun his work at Barium. It is believed that, through his efforts, the maximum results can be obtained from the dairy and, thus, an examination as to the effectiveness of the program now would be very helpful to the administration and to the Board. The farm manager together with the superintendent aided by the farm committee will be giving diligent study to the total operation and its relationship to the Home. Subsequently, recommendations should be forthcoming from the farm committee for the continuation of the program as it is or as it should be changed.

The educational fund is a life saver for the children of the Barium family. In September, there were thirty children from Barium in school or in training. Twenty-three of these were from the Home and seven were children of the staff members. They were studying or taking training in eighteen different institutions, most of which are in North Carolina.

## Howard Cottage To Be Rebuilt

### Salisbury Firm Submits Low Bid

Howard cottage will be replaced in the year 1961 by a new building, which will continue to bear the original name of Howard Cottage. In the early days of the history of Barium Springs this building was erected and named Howard cottage in memory of Mrs. Anna Stamps Howard. For more than sixty years little girls of Junior age have lived here and made it their home. Erected originally with the plan of sleeping porches and congregate dressing rooms, it afforded space for two dozen children. In the recent years it has become the home for a group of girls of all ages, the same as the other cottages on the campus.

The new building will be one story, fire proof in the same type of the two newest buildings on the campus. It will be built with the family dining room, living room and play area in the center with rooms for eight children at each

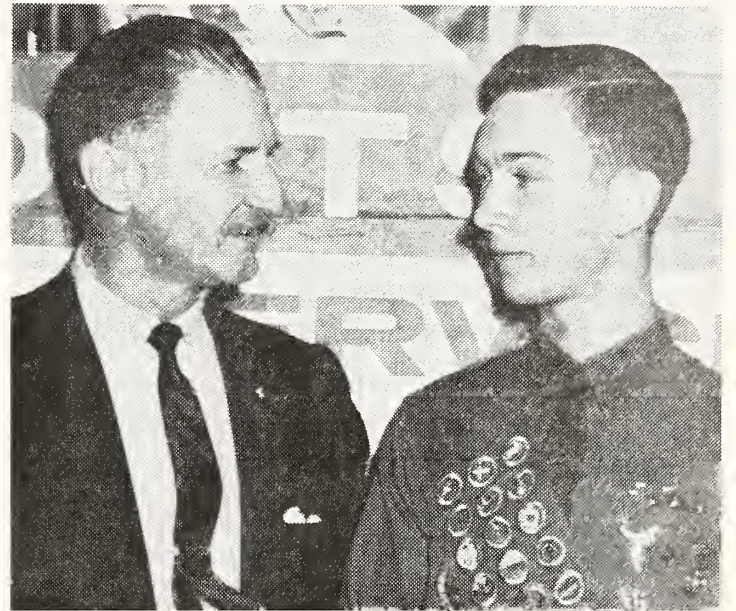
end of the building, making room for sixteen in all. There will, also be the housemother's quarters and the guest room. This new type building will replace the multi-story buildings that have been used in the past.

The new cottage is built with the idea that it could be self-contained and could serve meals in the cottage if and when that were necessary. Also, it is possible to be used for boys to live in one end of the building and girls in the other if and when such a plan is feasible or desirable. However, at the present, it will continue to be used for girls only and the central dining room will remain in force on campus.

The girls who have been occupying this building and have now had to move seem to find this becoming a regular routine. At the time of the tearing down another cottage and replacing it many of these same children moved out into an-

other building and named themselves the "Bee Tree." Now they are moving out of old Howard Cottage while it is being torn down and are living in cramped quarters, which is called the "Squirrel's Nest." The stay in the "Squirrel's Nest" will be for six months duration and they will be returning to the new cottage for their own. The architects sketch has been pasted up on the wall in the hall of the old quarters to keep the courage and hope high for the entering of the new building when it is finished in late summer.

J. N. Pease and Company of Charlotte, the architects for the two latest cottages on the campus, are, also, the architects for this building. The contract was awarded to the low bidder of L. S. Bradshaw and Sons in Salisbury, North Carolina. This new building should certainly bear a Presbyterian influence because it is being erected on the Presbyterian campus, designed by a Presbyterian architect and constructed by a Presbyterian contractor.

# UNDER THE STEEPLE

If it were not for the Annual Statistical Report which has to be filed with the Clerk of Presbytery at the beginning of each year, we pastors would probably never get our Church Roll in proper order. I was never too good at accounting, and when it comes to keeping books on Church members without "doctoring" the figures, I have a pretty hard time. The whole thing would be easy if we didn't have to reconcile our figures with the facts. Starting with the number reported a year ago, we add the number received during the year on profession of faith. Then we add the number received by certificate, or by reaffirmation of faith. Then, if any members have risen from the dead file that we politely call "The Retired Roll," we can add them, and the resulting sum is "Total Communicants on Roll during the year."

Let me interrupt this bookkeeping procedure long enough to comment on "Retired Roll Members." The BOOK OF CHURCH ORDER, (Par. 304) says, "The name of any member whose residence has been unknown for two years to the Session, or who for two years has not attended its services, contributed to its financial support, or otherwise manifested an interest in the church may, after diligent effort to locate and re-enlist said member has failed, be retired by the Session to a separate roll for retired members. The names on this roll shall not be reported to the Presbytery in the annual statistical report as a part of the total membership of the church." A retired member is "restored" by the Session when said member resumes his attendance upon the ordinances of the church. The testimony of most pastors would probably indicate that the restoration of retired members is a rare privilege.

It is hoped that no reader of these lines has cause to wonder if he has been quietly put away by the Session because of failure to respond to overtures and invitations made by the pastor and his flock. It is as fervently hoped that no lost sheep has been forgotten or neglected by the under-shepherd and the sheep within the fold, so that overtures and invitations have not been proffered! In any case, it is a said affair when members who, once upon a time, stood before the congregation and took solemn vows "to live as becometh a follower of Christ" have gotten so lost from the work and worship of the Lord's Church, that they are no longer counted among the living. It has been my experience to discover that it is easier to win new converts than to re-enlist those who have retired.

Back to the ecclesiastical bookkeeping: From the sum total of communicants on roll during the calendar year, deductions are made on the basis of 1) Certificates of transfer granted to members who move to other churches, 2) Transfer of members to the "Retired Roll," as described above, and 3) Transfer of Members to the Church Triumphant. The sum of these deductions is taken from the total communicants on roll during the year, and the resulting figure equals the net communicants on roll as of a given December 31. This is the answer. But if, when the pastor counts his flock, calling each by name and address, he gets another "answer" there is evidence that his arithmetic is faulty or that he doesn't know his sheep's whereabouts! So the search is begun and continues until the facts and the figures coincide. Good discipline for the pastor, but how many of us would engage in such exercise if not required to do so by the Presbytery.

Our report for the year ending December 31, 1960 shows 224 as the number reported last year; 24 added on profession of faith, 5 added on certificate, none restored from the retired roll: a total of 253 communicants during the year. From this number we deducted 30, 19 of whom took their places in the limbo of the retired; 10 of whom were dismissed at their own request to other churches; and one of whom joined the great cloud of witnesses. Total reported on roll Dec. 31: 223.

Our 223 members are in five groups, the largest of which contains 95 children in residence at Barium Springs. There are 74 in the next group, composed of adult members of the Barium Family and surrounding community; 26 of our members are students in schools or colleges away from Little Joe's Church; 19 are in Military Service; and there are 10 non-resident members, most of whom are present for worship at least once during the course of a year.

In the financial column of our statistical report, the Treasurer listed total benevolences at \$3,196 and Current Expenses at \$6,965 for the year, making the grand total of all contributions stand at \$10,161, an all time record for the congregation.

Enough of facts and figures! God is surely concerned more with souls than with statistics. # Troutman Trips West Rowan

Forward Jim McAbee and Center Danny Loftin came through when the chips were down last night, pulling Troutman's Bobcats out of their tailspin in the North Piedmont Conference in a 71-52 skirmish over West Rowan's Falcons.

And it couldn't have happened at a better time. Monroe knocked off East Rowan's Mustangs last night, pinning the first defeat on East in the NPC, to put both clubs into a tie for first with Troutman now moving a slim half-game behind both front-runners. East Rowan and Monroe now hold 7-1 records; Troutman is 6-2.

Coach Mary Ruth Godfrey didn't have anything at all to cheer her in the opener as Troutman was out-classed all the way in a 58-39 loss. The win ran West Rowan's loop record to 7-1 to keep them on the heels of Children's Home, a club they tackle Thursday night at Winston-Salem.

It was, in a final analysis, a fouling and foulshooting encounter. Officials Murray Osborne and Don Emblar called 56 fouls in the tussle—30 on West and 26 on Troutman.

And, it was the loss on fouls of four of their five starters and one reserve that killed West's hopes, while Troutman's chances hung on a slim thread in the fourth period. They had lost top reserve Braxton Bridgers on fouls in the third period and all five starters had four personals, with Wayne Rogers the only one failing to go the distance—he fouled out with six seconds left.

West lost starters Billy Hall and Bill Scoggins in the third period and starters Gary McNeely and Benny Robbins in the final quarter, with reserve Ed Graham also fouling out in the final stanza.

Neither team was able to make the grade at the foul line. It was from the floor that Troutman picked up their margin, sinking 26 to 50 field goals, while West Rowan counted only 16 of 57 attempts. At the foul circle, Troutman dropped 19 of 41 and West connected on 20 of 37.

Troutman led all the way, but that doesn't reveal the type of game. It was a spree by McAbee,

Loftin, Wayne Rogers, and Chris Smith that moved from a 2-1 to a 11-1 margin in the first four minutes. Troutman gained a 38-24 margin at halftime.

But the Bobcats almost blew their margin in the final half. Only four field goals were counted during 22 points scored in the third period as it became a foul-shooting contest.

Troutman carried a 45-39 lead into the final eight minutes and West Rowan rallied behind Loy Sigmon's two quick goals to slice Troutman's edge to 50-47 with 5:40 left.

McAbee drove with five minutes left for a basket, tossed in a one-hander with 4:08 showing and Loftin dropped in two foul tosses—the first of eight in succession at the foul line—for a 56-47 margin to give the Bobcats a little breathing space.

West cut it again to 56-49 in their final surge. With 2:50 showing, McAbee drove and jumped, taking out the bottom of the nets, Loftin dropped in four straight at the foul line, then drove for a basket for a 64-49 margin with 1:22 showing and it was all over. A Loftin three-pointer, Wayne Rogers' steal and layup and two Rogers foul shots with 19 seconds left gave Troutman a 71-51 margin before Billy Howell's foul toss made it the final 71-52 tally.

Loftin had his best night this season in a 30-point effort in 10 of 21 field goals and 10 to 15 at the foul line. His top efforts prior to last night were 28 against North Rowan and 25 at Monroe. Wayne Rogers had 15 and Jim McAbee hit 14. Gary McNeely led West with 20, while Loy Sigmon added 16.

Troutman's girls were pushed down quickly in the first period by West Rowan's Lou Klutz. Bobcat guard Ginger Kiser picked up three fouls in the first minute and 20 seconds and Troutman was in trouble quickly. West had an 11-6 margin when Klutz cut loose with her bombardment.

While Troutman went scoreless for four minutes, Klutz elevated West into a 21-6 lead. West started subbing in the second period the rest of the way, with Troutman able to cut it down in the fourth period against West subs.

West Rowan held a 58-27 margin with 3:40 left. Jackie Taylor and Pat Ross got hot and cut it down to the final 58-39 tally from that point.

Troutman hit on 15 of 62 field goals and only nine of 31 foul tosses, while West counted 21 of 47 goals and 16 of 27 foul shots. Taylor had 19 for Troutman, with Ross adding 16. Klutz dropped 20 and Mildred Safrit had 13 for West Rowan.

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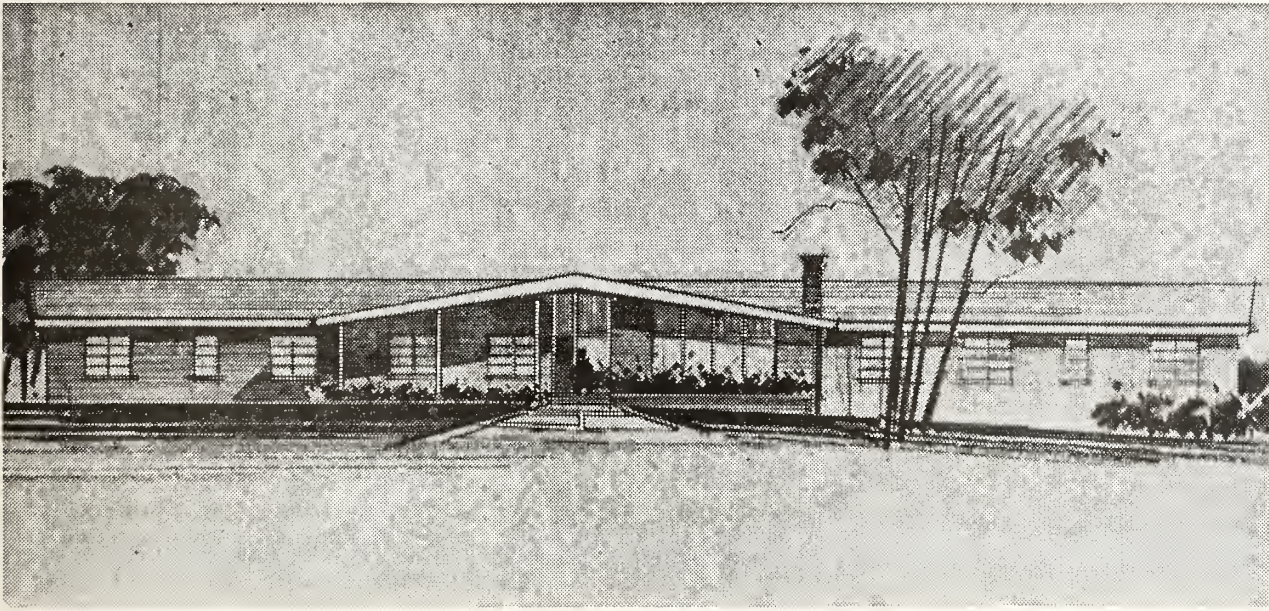

## Boys Share Conference Title And Seeded First In Tournament

The hectic season of basketball has come to a close and the tournaments have rounded out the three and a half months of basketball practice and playing. The Troutman boys team on which the Barium children participate ended the season in a three way tie for first place, and in the tournament pairings were ruled the No. 1 spot. The girls in their up and down season ended in the lower half of the conference standing, but, still made the tournament for the first round in which they were eliminated by a strong Monroe girls team.

West Rowan's Falcons knocked the top-ranked Bobcats out of the running in a 46-45 rattle and North Rowan's Cavaliers downed Davie County, 56-50.

Troutman, which finished in a three-way tie with East Rowan and Monroe for the boys division title, beat West Rowan twice during regular season but couldn't fight off the determined Falcons.

A man-to-man defense, with West star Gary McNeely hanging on tight to Troutman center Danny Loftin, could be termed as a decisive factor. McNeely held Loftin to only two field goals in the first half and both were late in the second period. Loftin, who was able to hit only four of 20 attempts from the floor, had just seven points in the first half and grabbed five more in the second half for 12, with Loy Sigmon handling the defensive assignment in the second half as McNeely picked up three personals.

Jim McAbee, hitting on seven of 17 field goals and four of four foul shots, led Troutman's efforts with 18 points.

McNeely, sinking eight of 13 field goals and three of five foul shots, hit 19 for West Rowan, with

Bill Scroggins following with 15 and Loy Sigmon picking up 10.

Troutman wound up with 30 per cent from the floor, sinking 15 of 50 field goals and added 15 of 22 foul shots. West Rowan had 39.1 per cent on 18 of 46 attempts from the field and 10 of 19 foul shots.

Troutman had two shots at the basket in the final 10 seconds but missed on both attempts in an effort to pull out the victory.

The Bobcats rolled into a 6-0 lead on back-to-back goals by McAbee and Chris Smith, but West Rowan rallied for a 7-7 deadlock with a minute left. McAbee's goal and a long shot from past mid-court by Chris Smith with one second showing gave Troutman an 11-7 edge.

Smith pushed it to 13-7 at the outset of the second period. With 6:30 left, McAbee suffered a sprained ankle and had to have it taped, missing some three minutes of action. West surged back to a 14-14 tie and it was deadlocked four times until the final minute of the half. McNeely's foul shot and a field goal with 24 seconds left gave West Rowan a 23-20 lead and Loftin's goal with 13 seconds showing cut it back to 23-22 at half-time.

West moved into a 25-22 lead at the start of the third period, but Troutman came back on goals by McAbee and Loftin and a foul shot by Smith for a 27-25 lead. Sigmon's goal tied it at 27-27 with 3:51 left. West moved out to a 36-30 margin as Scroggins and Sigmon led the way, with Troutman slicing it back to 36-35 in the final 20 seconds. McAbee's goal, a foul shot by Smith and two charity tosses by Wayne Rogers cut it down.

# UNDER THE STEEPLE

Every now and then our congregation reads in unison Psalm 130 printed in the Scripture readings at the end of The Hymnbook. The Psalm is the cry of a man whose life has been broken by sin, and whose heart has been broken by the mercy of the forgiving God who will still give ear to the penitent's cry. This pleading "out of the depths" is the prayer of every man who wants to be made whole by the Savior.

"Out of the depths I cry to thee, O Lord!" The cry comes from the depths of depression and distress. It comes from the darkness which sin casts over a man's soul. It comes from a sinner who has nothing to his credit but his hope in a Savior: "O Lord, hear my voice!"

Who but God can hear the anguished cry from the depths of the human heart? He not only hears, He helps. He hears the faint bleating of one lost lamb of the flock, and goes out into the night to search until He finds. It is His mercy in coming, not His wrath at having to come that touches the heart of the sinner and induces penitence and awesome fear (not terror): "There is forgiveness with Thee that Thou mayest be feared."

The man of faith is sure that God will listen to his confession and accept his penitence, and forgive his sin, and redeem his life. So he waits for the mercy of the Lord not fretfully, but confidently. He waits with more confidence than the nightwatchman waiting for the first sign of light in the eastern sky—the light that has never failed: "more than watchman for the morning."

The penitent hopes not "against hope" as though there were only an outside chance of forgiveness; he hopes rather in the Lord, love is steadfast, whose redemption is plenteous.

Is it not precisely because God does see into the depths where sorrow for sin and love for Him are mingled in a common desire for victory over the world the flesh and the devil that His love is ready to forgive and to redeem? The Psalmist is certain, and we should be also, that "... He will redeem Israel from all his iniquities."

# DOES THIS ANSWER YOUR QUESTION?

## What Is Barium Springs?

Seventy-five to one hundred years ago, Barium Springs was a health resort where people came for rest and a drink of barium water to restore their physical vigor. Today, Barium Springs no longer features the water from the spring but is rather a service of healing for boys and girls under the care of the Presbyterian Church. The place is home to hundreds of boys and girls every year. This means food, shelter, clothing, dental work, medical care, school, work, and play, and worship for all who live here. It means security where there was none; partnership, where there are still those who can share in the life of the child. Established in 1891, the Home has served thousands of boys and girls.

## Who Owns the Home at Barium Springs?

The Presbyterian Church in the Synod of North Carolina owns and controls all properties and assets of the Home.

## How Is The Home Governed?

The Synod of North Carolina elects men and women from every presbytery to membership on the Board of Regents. The Regents meet twice annually on the campus to receive and act upon the full reports of the work of the Home and to project the policies of procedure which are in keeping with good standards of child care. The superintendent, chosen by the Regents and responsible to them, is charged with the operation of the institution.

## How Many Children Can The Home Care For?

In its beginning, the Home had less than twenty-five children. At its maximum enrollment, more than a quarter of a century ago, there were three hundred sixty-five on campus in an unbelievably crowded condition. A good working capacity for the Home is two hundred twenty-five boys and girls.

## How Many Children Live In A Cottage?

Ordinarily, twelve to sixteen children live in one building, ranging in age from six to seniors in high school. Boys and girls live in separate cottages, but the cottages often are located near each other so that there are natural and wholesome relationships between boys and girls every day.

## How Is A Child Admitted?

Applications are made by the Presbyterian minister in a local community. Then, a casework study is made by the Home to determine if the Home is capable of meeting the needs. The final decision on admission is made subsequent to the investigation.

## Does Barium Springs Take Infants?

The needs of very young children cannot be met in large institutional settings. Children who are of pre-school age need to be provided for in a natural home setting. Ordinarily, children between the ages of five and fifteen are admitted. If a child older than fifteen needs to come to Barium Springs and the Home can meet his needs, admis-

sion is offered, even to a senior in high school.

## How Long Does A Child Stay In The Home?

Residence in the Home varies according to the needs of the child. He may be at Barium for one or two years, or it may be necessary for him to stay until he is graduated from high school. An earnest effort is made to keep in close touch with the family and, if the way be clear, to return the child to his own community at the earliest possible date. In the event that this is not possible, he may continue at Barium Springs until he has finished high school.

## What Happens After High School Graduation?

The Home considers the graduates to be children of the church and makes provisions for them to receive further education or training or assists in securing employment for those who want work. This is financed through the educational fund which is being supported by the memorial gifts—memorial gifts made in the past and those continuing to be made through the memorial fund.

## Do the Children Ever Leave the Home To Visit with Families In the Church?

It is most desirable that the boys and girls have opportunity to return to their own home community and to spend their vacation time with their parents if this be possible or with some relative in the community. In the event that there is no place for the child to spend the summer vacation, invitations are accepted for these children to visit in church homes. The children remain on the campus at Christmas time, and gifts for Christmas are provided by individuals, circles, Sunday schools, and churches.

## Can A Child of the Home Be Adopted?

The parent or local guardian is the only one who can make a child eligible for adoption by giving his consent. When a child in the Home is eligible for adoptive placement, the casework department, through the Children's Home Society, makes the placement. It is the policy to try to secure adoptive homes for every child eligible to be placed.

## What Vocations Have The Students of Barium Springs Chosen?

As is true generally, many of the high school boys and girls have married after graduation and have begun their own homes. A successful and happy home is the highest end which can be reached by any child or children whether they have grown up at Barium Springs or elsewhere. Barium graduates are found in the ranks of nearly all the professions. The roster shows that men and women are ministers, directors of Christian education, teachers, psychiatrists, dentists, coaches, carpenters, plumbers, linotype operators, printers, postmasters, church business managers, lawyers, bank presidents, morticians, nurses, x-ray technicians, beauticians, army officers, mechanics, salesmen, automobile area managers, and others. Of course, every child that comes to the Home does not

reach full satisfaction for himself nor the ideals of the Home. This is, also, quite true in the natural family. However, those who have graduated from the high school after their stay in the Home have been good citizens of the state and of the Kingdom.

## How Is The Home Supported?

Primarily, the Home is supported by the regular benevolence giving of the people through the churches and the special Thanksgiving offering. These gifts provide for the operational needs.

## Are The Books Audited?

A professional firm has an annual audit of the accounts of the Home and makes its report to the Board of Regents. Copies of this audit are regularly placed on file in the Synod's office.

## How Much Do You Have To Pay To Get A Child In?

No child is ever accepted or rejected on the basis of money. Presbyterians of the Synod of North Carolina, through their contributions, support the Home. However, each parent or responsible relative who can make any contribution to the Home for the child is required to do so according to his ability.

## Do The Children Help Support Themselves?

Every child in the Home has a job equal to his age and ability. The cottages have to be kept clean and even the youngest has his part to do. The girls serve in the dining room, help prepare meals, work in the laundry, in the sewing room, in the infirmary, and in the office. The boys are assigned to the dairy, to the forty acre orchard, to the five hundred acre farm, to the maintenance of the thirty-five acre campus, to the shop crew for painting and repairing buildings, and to the gardens for the production of vegetables for the table and storage.

## What About Buildings?

All buildings on the campus and major physical improvements have been made from the capital fund. Money in this fund is derived from special gifts and legacies.

## Is There A School On The Campus?

The primary school, grades one through four, at present is on the campus. Grades five through twelve have been moved to the consolidated school at Troutman. School buses transport the children to and from school.

## What Religious Instruction Is Given?

Children of the Home are required to attend the regular services of Little Joe's Presbyterian Church each Sunday. This includes the church school, the morning worship, and the youth group meetings in the evening. A prayer service is held in the church every Wednesday evening. Boys and girls sing in the choir and the boys serve as ushers in the congregation. Also, a special program of Christian nurture is designed for each cottage where the group lives in family style.

*How Many People On The Staff?*  
There is a great variety of activity on the campus that requires fifty to sixty adults. Included in the staff are dietitians, nurses, hostesses, housemothers, supervisors, purchasing agent, bookkeepers, typists, caseworkers, firemen, farmers, dairymen, orchard men, carpenters, plumbers, preachers, teachers, and a superintendent.

*What About Institutional Work and Its Place In The Total Picture of Child Care?*

It is commonly agreed that there is a threefold function in child care. Children are provided for through adoptions, through foster homes, and institutional care. The church is not alone in serving boys and girls. The federal and state governments, following in the footsteps of the church, have turned to the care of children through its departments of public welfare. There are today more children receiving care than ever in the history of the country. However, all the agencies working together have not yet met the needs of children and there are hundreds who need what these agencies have to offer. In North Carolina, there is fine cooperative effort on the part of the denominational, fraternal and state agencies in rendering services to the children of this state.

*How Can I Remember Barium Springs By Will?*

The spirit of God has moved upon the hearts of many people to provide for boys and girls in their will. Without these gifts of love the Home could not have existed. The full name to be used in the will is "Regents of the Orphans' Home of the Presbyterian Church of North Carolina at Barium Springs."

*What Is The Greatest Need?*

The Home needs divine guidance wrought out through prayer. Presbyterians and those who love Barium Springs should pray for this place, the boys and girls, and the adult leadership. Effective service cannot be rendered to the children unless the total church remembers this work in prayer. Dealing with the immortal spirits of the boys and girls is a most important part of the work. When men and women unite their hearts in prayer for divine guidance, surely His blessing will rest upon the work with His children at Barium Springs.

**Southeastern Child Care Association To Meet**

The month of April will bring the annual meeting of the Southeastern Child Care Association. This is the new name for the old Tri State Conference which was later called the Southeastern Conference for Workers in Childrens Homes and now bears the new name. Executives, Caseworkers, Houseparents and other Staff Members will convene in Winston-Salem during April. There, under the leadership of professionally trained people, problems pertaining to the work of caring for children will be discussed. Reports will be made from the Child Care Projects sponsored jointly by the Southeastern Child Care Association and the University of North Carolina, and officers for the coming year will be elected.

## Board Of Regents To Convene In May

The Board of Regents will hold its annual Spring Meeting at Barium Springs during the second week of May. For four of the members, it will be their final meeting as this will complete the second four-year term and they are, by the rules of Synod, ineligible for re-election. The retiring members are Mrs. Emmett Crook, Mecklenburg Presbytery; Mr. Charles T. Hagan, Jr., Orange Presbytery; Mr. Ennis Jackson, Kings Mountain Presbytery; and Mrs. Flake Steele, Sr., Winston-Salem Presbytery. Mr. Finley T. White, the other member of the Class of '61, has asked to be replaced on the Board. Thus the Regents will be offering suggestions to the nominating committee for the five replacements on the Board at the next meeting of the Synod of North Carolina.

The Board, under the direction of President M. C. Benton, Jr., will be formulating its annual report to the Synod of North Carolina and preparing the budget to present to the Council and then to the Synod for the year '61 and '62. Special interest will center in the proposed evaluation of the Home that is being planned by the Board members. Dr. Alan Keith-Lucas, Professor in the school of social work at the University of North Carolina, the director of Child Care Project of the Southeastern Child Care Conference, and nationally recognized leader in the field of Child Care, is being asked to give a special study to the present operation of the Home and to set forth goals for the future. This report will be received at the Fall Meeting of the Board.

## An Organ Is Dedicated And A Tribute Given

Steele Creek Presbyterian Church recently dedicated a new organ in memory of Doctor and Mrs. J. M. Walker. Because of the faithful service of Doctor and Mrs. Walker in the Steele Creek Church to the Home at Barium Springs, the tribute prepared by Elder J. M. Boyles is carried herewith: "I have been asked to turn some of the pages in the book called memory. There are those who could do this with more fitting words, but since I have been chosen I will have to do it in my own simple way.

"To those of you who have moved into Steele Creek community and joined this church since the year 1950, when you hear the name Walker that perhaps to you is just another name. But to those of us who have been here down through the years when we hear the name Walker our thoughts go back to Dr. John Mack Walker, to his good wife, Mrs. Annie Muller Walker, and to their four fine children, John Mack, Jr., Lila Peck, English, and Sara. Dr. Walker was pastor of Steele Creek Church for more than twenty-seven years. He and his good family lived in the Steele Creek manse. For more than twenty-seven years they walked with us in our everyday life. They shared with us in our sorrows as well as our joys.

"On a cold night in October in the year 1920, a telephone call came to our home saying that the

new preacher and his family had arrived in this community. Their furniture was in a boxcar at the Southern Freight Depot in Charlotte and they needed help to be moved. My daddy told me that we would get up early the next morning and he would let me take the wagon and go along with a number of others who had volunteered to help the move. No sooner had we backed up to the manse and pushed the furniture through the door and drove away when things started moving at Steele Creek and they have been on the move ever since.

"Immediately Dr. Walker saw the need of a Sunday School building here at this church. He called the people together and told them of a plan for this Sunday School building right behind the choir. The response to that meeting was marvelous. Shortly after that he told of the need of a Community House to be built somewhere on the church ground property. Quickly the people came together and that building was erected. But soon after that a terrible depression struck—one like we had never seen before nor since. But Dr. and Mrs. Walker never seemed to let us lose the faith. That building was completed and paid for in due time.

"To those of you here today who were young people back in the days when I was a boy will always remember and cherish the good times

## Calvin Burleson Honored In First Year

Both the coach and one of his players won top honors in the Greenville News Second Annual Big 14 All-Star. The coach was Calvin Burleson, a former Barium Student, and the player was George Lyons of Rock Hill School who had played for Burleson during the year. The coaches were invited to vote for their selection in the Big 14. Burleson in his first year of coaching won his award in a close race with Coach Herb Robinson of the State Champion Dreher High Blue Devils. A 1960 graduate of Appalachian State Teachers College at Boone, North Carolina, Coach Burleson played three years of football there. He is a native of Barium Springs, North Carolina. "I am really surprised and very lucky to win this," Burleson said. "I was fortunate in having the boys to work with and especially lucky to have George Lyons."

The Bearcats had a 20-6 overall record this season and a 12-6 conference mark counting tournament play. In the year before the Bearcats only won seven games.

Special recognition was taken of the services of the four members who were completing their second term of four years and who were, by the rules of the Synod, ineligible for re-election. Mrs. Flake Steele, Sr., of Winston-Salem Presbytery; Mrs. Emmett Crook of Mecklenburg Presbytery; Mr. Ennis Jackson of Kings Mountain Presbytery; and Mr. Charles Hagan, Jr., of Orange Presbytery were commended for their loyal service during their eight years. Mr. Finley T. White of Granville Presbytery completing the first four-year term asked not to be re-elected.

The Board approved the plan to have Doctor Alan Keith-Lucas of the University of North Carolina do a special study of the work of the Home. He will be requested to evaluate the program as it now exists and will offer recommendations to the Board relative to the

## The New Swimming Pool In Regular Use

It's here and it's wonderful! The beautiful new swimming pool is ideally located on the west side of the campus near the site of the old one. It is a thing of beauty and is going to be a source of great delight for many years to come. Approximately fifty feet wide at the wide and shallow end, it has a length on the back side of nearly one hundred feet. Since its shape is a bit of an elbow, the narrow side is a little shorter. The narrow end, twenty-five feet wide, is the diving well equipped with two boards—one one-meter high, and one three-meters high.

This pool was designed by R. D. Tillson and Associates of High Point and constructed by Gilbert Engineering Company of Statesville. Its design was dictated by the three functions that were to be served. Special consideration was given to the fact that the little people would need shallow water and a wide place in which to play. Secondly, a large group of boys and girls would need water of reasonable depth for playing and swimming; and that no pool would be satisfactory without the diving boards and the diving well. Thus the depth of the pool goes from two feet in the shallow corner to eleven feet under the high board, meeting the regular specifications for pools of this kind. On the opening day there were more than a hundred and twenty-five in the pool for the first opening and while various turns had to be awaited at the diving board, there was room for all in the play area.

In the event that swimming meets are desirable, the diving well will be postponed, the rope dividing the well from the play area will be removed and a five lane swimming area can be set up. Designed and equipped with a filtering system which will guarantee pure water for swimming, this pool will be a delight both day and night. A tall pole at one end of the pool affords ample light for night swimming. This will be an innovation at Barium Springs and a delightful one for all those who enjoy a dip in the cool of the evening.

The boys and girls who have been a part of the Barium Family for many years have graduated and have moved on into their places, and the nineteen members of the rising senior class have replaced them for the year to come. These ten girls and nine boys are already busy taking up the roles usually carried out by the members of the senior class. They will be host and hostesses at the tables. They will afford cottage leadership in the absence of the houseparent. They will enjoy the long awaited privilege of the coffee cup at the breakfast table and eagerly anticipate one year hence when they shall have completed their high school course.

Much is to be done through the summer and the senior year. Vocational guidance testing must be done to determine the interest and capabilities of each student. Plans must be made for college admission, for entrance to nurses' training. (Continued on Page 2)

## MEMORIAL FUND IS LOVE IN ACTION

More than two dozen boys and girls of the Barium family would vouch for the accuracy of the above headline. It would be found in various places of learning and training away from Barium Springs. Reaching up and down the eastern seaboard from South Carolina to New Hampshire. Each of them was able to go to college or go into the training of their choosing only because of the Memorial Educational Fund. All through the years of the history of Barium Springs individuals have been interested in assisting the boys and girls of the Home but never has there been sufficient funds to meet the needs. Special educational funds have been established but the earnings of these funds were not adequate to guarantee the boys and girls of the Home additional training after they had finished their high school course.

When the new church building was finished, the Board of Regents

continued the memorial fund and made it applicable to the Educational Fund. Thus, guaranteeing to every Barium boy and girl the opportunity of pursuing after high school graduation some course of study or training for which he was best suited.

At the time of death, friends and loved ones express their love and sympathy to the family of the deceased by sending a cash contribution to Barium Springs for the memorial fund. Upon receipt of this contribution, a letter of appreciation is written to the donor and a special letter telling of the gift and the use of which it is to be applied is sent to the surviving members of the family. Thus, the dearest loves of those who have made contributions are interwoven into the Educational Fund and become a part of the life of the boys and girls who are the recipients of the fund.

How does it work, someone asked? The answer is that the student and the Home go into partnership. His summer earnings are made applicable to his own needs. He is required subsequent to his first semester or the first year in school to obtain some job through which he can help himself on the campus during his winter study. The funds from the Educational Memorial Fund then guarantee that tongue and buckle will meet and sometimes it's a wide gap between tongue and buckle from the earnings of some of the students who are limited by reason of being unable

to find good jobs during the short summer months.

Each student pledges himself to the Superintendent of the Home giving him the rights of a parent and the Superintendent in the name of the Home pledges to the student to assume the responsibilities of a parent in providing for the need. Thus, a close cooperative effort is begun and carried out by those who are under the direction of the Home.

In some instances, the supervision of the student is committed to a parent or guardian and the Home contributes the necessary amount to the educational need.

This money is not a loan fund. These boys and girls are considered to be and really are children of the church; and as a part of the Barium family which is the church's family, have a right to share in this fund so long as they do their part and give a good account of themselves in their training or academic pursuits.

## THANK YOU

More than 30 boys and girls from the Home have attended the church camps operated by the Presbytery at Camp Grier during the summer. This has been made possible by the special gifts sent in by individuals and groups over the Synod. Now, a sincere thank you is in order and we pass on this word of appreciation.

## THE MINISTER SPEAKS TO BOARD OF REGENTS

### ON THE GENERAL RELIGIOUS ATMOSPHERE OF THE HOME

How does one measure or interpret the religious atmosphere of a community? What are the measuring sticks? What are the criteria?

One has to be careful in using external tangible tools to evaluate what is so very personal and intangible as "religious atmosphere." We are tempted to bring in figures, to count noses, and to outline "Programs" which relate to the religious atmosphere but which are nothing more than the frame in which it is set.

Religious atmosphere is something that is "felt" or "sensed" and even here there is room for error. One cannot base his judgment by a sampling of a religious service or by an inspecting of building or equipment, or even by an interview with a member of the congregation. All of these help, but at the same time, all can be misleading. Even a report from the minister, who has an inside view, must necessarily be subjective, however objective he may try to be.

If religious atmosphere can be described with any degree of satisfaction, it must be in terms of the general response of the community to the claims of the Gospel. In my judgment, the response is good; not extra-ordinary, not less than average, but better than average, and perhaps better than one would expect in an institutional framework where Church attendance and regular religious activities are on a group basis. For example:

1. Response at worship services and to the preaching of the Word seems to be good. The congregation, though captive, is not indifferent. Worship seems to be genuine. The minister has considerable encouragement from the attentiveness and participation by the group.

2. In the cottages, children take part in regular devotions led by cottage mothers from three to five times a week. Family devotions are difficult to maintain, and it is even more difficult to keep regular devotional exercises from becoming mechanical and simply a matter of form. I think that the response of our children in this religious endeavor is average.

3. There are occasions when an external stimulus reveals wholesome and advanced religious development, as when our Senior High group, inspired by a missionary rally returned home to raise money for an extra contribution to world missions by washing cars on a Saturday afternoon. Nineteen students washed 22 cars and raised thirty-three dollars.

All in all, I believe that most of our students could give a good account of themselves in an examination on "Experimental Religion."

### ON THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE HOME AND THE CHURCH

When a Church is situated on the grounds of an institution, and when the Church building and manse is the property of a Synod, and when that Church exists primarily, but not exclusively for the benefit of the religious growth and nurture of children who have been deprived of a normal church and home relation, it is imperative that the Church and the Institution work together as under the same yoke. Jesus once said, "Come to me, all whose work is hard, whose load is heavy; and I will give you relief. Bend your necks to my yoke, and learn from me, . . . for my yoke is good to bear, and my load is light." (Mt. 11:28-30) When the institution, in this case the Barium Springs Home For Children, and the Church, which is Little Joe's, are joined under the yoke of Him who said "Let the little children come unto me," and who is the great Head of the Church, then truly the yoke is good to bear, and the burden is light. In such a relationship, the Church and the Home are co-laborers. Specifically,

1. The relationship between the Minister and the Superintendent leaves nothing to be desired. Communications are frank, frequent, and friendly. The channel for communication is always open, and it is a two way street.

The Minister has made no request which has not received full consideration and prompt attention by the Superintendent. The Superintendent has a sympathetic eye to the needs of the Church and has been anxious to supply such things as additional hymn books, films, film-strips, library books, motion picture equipment and other items, major and minor that have aided in worship and religious instruction.

Permission has been quickly given with reference to students attending special religious services and activities off campus when the minister has requested it.

Cooperation in securing a Director of Youth Work resulted in the employment of Miss Rosemary Rector last Fall. The financial obligation of the Church in this enterprise is only token, but the Director is under the supervision of the Session and carries out her work under the direction of the minister.

Major endeavors of mutual concern to Home and Church, such as Christian Education, Evangelism, and Christian conduct are undertaken "hand-in-glove" by the Minister and the Superintendent.

2. The relationship between the Session of Little Joe's Church and the Administration of the Home, in like manner, leaves nothing to be desired. Time and again, the

## STRICKLIN RESIGNS PASTORATE

(The following news story about Ernest Stricklin, a Barium boy, appeared recently in the Hazard Herald of Hazard, Ky.)

The Rev. Mr. Ernest Stricklin, Pastor of The First Presbyterian Church of Hazard for the past six years, will leave Hazard June 30 to enroll in the Graduate School of Theology of Boston University, Boston, Massachusetts to study for a Th. E. Degree in Christian Family Life.

During his ministry in Hazard, The Fellowship Hall, New Organ, and Bell Carrillon, a remodeling of the entire Church Edifice inside, and the Steinway piano were added to the plant. Other additions included new hymnals, kitchen equipment, pastor's study, conference room, an electric mimeographer, and a new heating plant.

An effective youth program with the Presbyterian Guidance Program and leadership training were instituted along with Laboratory Training for each department in the Church School. A Bible Study emphasis was begun in the Women of the Church through trained leadership. Five additional church school classes were organized. \$310,000.00 were contributed to the total cause of the Church which included contributions to the new Presbyterian Church at London, the consolidated Presbyterian Church at Shouldersblade, and the proposed new church at Haymond. 150 new members were added to the church membership.

While in Hazard, Mr. Stricklin served as a Commissioner to the 98th General Assembly, Trustee of Lees College, Youth Advisor of Guerrant Presbytery, Stated Clerk of Presbytery along with being Chairman of World Missions and Annuities and Relief, Chairman of the Examinations of Ministers in Experimental Religion, Treasurer of Presbytery, Nominating Committee of Synod, Vice-president of Lions Club and Program Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of Booster's Club, President of Community Church Kindergarten, President of Ministerial Association, President of Perry County Council of Religious Education, coached Broadway Football Team for three years, and organized a Marriage Counseling Clinic in the First Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Stricklin wrote, under the direction of the Perry Council of Religious Education, the curriculum used in the Bible teaching program and taught the course two years.

The Stricklins have two daughters, Rebecca Ellen and Martha Elizabeth. They will live in Worcester, Mass. while Mr. Stricklin is studying at Boston University.

# UNDER THE STEEPLE

"Five Hundred Criminal Careers" is the heading of a paragraph that attracted my eye. Some thirty years ago, a study was made in Massachusetts of the lives of 500 men who had "graduated" from the Concord Reformatory. The resources and research facilities of Harvard University were employed in this scientific study of each of the men.

The work was sympathetically and thoroughly done. The lives of the young men were looked at as through a microscope—before they were arrested, afterwards, before they were sent to the "Correctional Institution" and after, during parole and after. They were seen in their relationships to family, friends, community, school, church, and employment.

Results: It was learned that only 12 of every hundred men showed indication of reform. For every 12 there were 88 who continued in their life of crime. There are two lessons to be learned from these results: 1) That what has been FORMING for 15 years cannot be RE-FORMED in 15 months (average length of term at Reform School), and 2) That crime may be preventable, but it is not very curable.

This same article went on to point out that in 1935 another study was made in Massachusetts which intended to prove that Social, Religious, Health and Welfare forces in a community could wipe out crime—or at least reduce it considerably. 325 delinquents called "the favored" were paired off against 325 other delinquents. The Favored group were worked on by the forces of health, religion, welfare etc. and the others were left to go their own way.

Results: No significant difference in the way the Favored Group turned out over those who were left alone. Lesson: It takes more than the combined forces of Society, Health, Religion and Welfare to UNDO what has been DONE. Or again, crime may be preventable, but it is awfully hard to cure.

Barium Springs, which is the hand of the Church outstretched to children who have been unable to enjoy the benefits of private family life, offers boys and girls the faith and hope and love that leads to wholesome living and good citizenship. Here, something is added to the Social and Religious, Health and Welfare forces that are forever at work against crime and degeneracy. It is the love of Jesus Christ for children expressed through the loving hands and hearts of the people throughout the Synod of North Carolina. His love not only redeems the lost, but it strengthens that which is noblest and strongest in the lives of His little ones.

No study has been made, that I know of, that would tell us what happens to our graduates. But I think it could be proven, if I may borrow the words of the friend who supplied the above data on Studies In Crime,—I think that it could be proven in a scientific study that "... substitute homes manned by good persons—Institutions manned from cook to superintendent by people of common sense and devotion—can direct the ways and attitudes of children toward good citizenship and sane living."

Such an institution is Barium Springs—from cook to superintendent. It bears all the frailties of flesh and spirit that belong to the race. But it is the redemptive arm of Christ in our midst—and in our world—to seek and to save what is lost.

Session, while not forgetting its responsibility to the off campus community, has shown that its primary responsibility is for the Christian nurture of the children who live at the front door of the Church. There is a genuine interest in and knowledge of the students by the Session, and there has existed a friendly spirit of cooperation between the Session and the Administration in all matters.

### THERE ARE THREE AREAS OF PARTICULAR CONCERN TO THE MINISTER

There are three areas of primary and continual concern:

1. Getting boys and girls to see and act upon the relation of faith to life. This has to do with behavior and with attitudes. Outwardly, we have the proper setting for cultivating the faith, and we have the proper organization, and the danger always is that we will preserve the outward form of religion while our actions and attitudes deny its reality. We must keep Church from being a perfunctory obligation, and worship from being a mechanical procedure. We must insure that our Junior Officers in the Church see their office not so much as an honor to themselves as an opportunity for honoring Christ and His Church.

2. Giving our boys and girls a Christian Education that is rooted and grounded in the knowledge of the Scriptures, and preparing them for a meaningful and sincere profession of faith in Jesus Christ.

3. Securing adult off-campus leadership in the Church School, in the Senior High and Pioneer Fellowships, and for the higher offices in the Church.

4. Sending children to the communities where they will find themselves after graduation with such a devotion to Christ and His Church that they will identify themselves with the Christian Community without undue delay, cherishing their opportunity for service and obedience to Christ in all the days to come.

Concluding statement:

It is a unique privilege to be the minister at Little Joe's Church. As the end of my third year in this pastorate draw to a close, I must say, "The lines have fallen for me in pleasant places."

## A County Fair In The Front Yard

Thoughtfulness and consideration of the Kiwanis Club and interested citizens make possible the visit of the boys and girls of the Home to the fair every year for a whole afternoon in the middle of the fair week. This occasion is not necessarily a great illumination of the mind or a time for saving money, but it is exciting and thrilling to the boys and girls who year after year look forward to the time when the fair comes to them.

## Board President Reports To Synod

It is a great pleasure to submit this report in behalf of the Board of Regents of the Presbyterian Orphans' Home. The year just concluded has been most successful in every respect and in many ways has been marked with rewarding achievements.

### Religious Life

The religious life of the campus is of primary concern for all who live and work at Barium Springs. The leadership of Rev. Hugh B. Carter assisted by Miss Rosemary Rector is most satisfactory, and the regular service of the church, the church school and youth groups are progressing in every respect. Individual work and study is carried on with the children and cottage programs and visitation are planned and successfully accomplished.

### School

This year, for the first time, grades five through eight joined grades nine through twelve at the Troutman Consolidated School. This new venture is working well, although it has brought about several changes in the daily operation of the Home, and has caused the administration and staff to be unusually busy in setting up a new pattern of life for the campus. The broadened community life has helped to reduce a good many of the tensions existing on the "Closed Campus." It affords an opportunity to see the reaction of the children in community life and also brings

to them many new and happy relationships.

### Home Facilities and Number of Children

The enrollment continues fairly steady at approximately 175 children while we have facilities available for 210.

The administration still adheres

to the policy of accepting only those who are a part of the church, directly or indirectly, and who have the full approval of the local church in the community from which the application comes.

### Finances

A total of \$345,762 was received into the "Operating Fund" during

the fiscal year ending September 30, 1960. 62% of this total came directly from the churches and we are most grateful for this generous and unselfish support. We are also truly grateful for the liberal and wonderful support from every source.

## Back To School By The Hundreds And To College By The Dozens

The Barium Springs family has shared with all other families in getting the boys and girls back in school and off to college for the winter's work. For the school days at home, there have been books and pencils, notebooks, Weekly Readers, class dues, registration fees, charges for special studies, gym suits, football equipment for the varsity and junior varsity, outfits for the band members, school enrollment and lunch room fees. It keeps a large number of people busy answering the questions and meeting the needs of the boys and girls as they prepare to continue their participation in the community school.

While this was going on, there was also the necessity of getting the boys and girls off to college. The Home's cars and station wagon have been piled high repeatedly with trunks, chairs, bed clothes, waste paper baskets, boxes, books, study lamps, pictures, coat hangers, and shoes as two dozen boys and girls have made their way to more than a dozen of the colleges in North Carolina and few beyond the bounds of the state. Barium Springs will be represented at Appalachian, Lees-McRae, Lenoir Rhyne, Mitchell, Woman's College, Pfeiffer, N. C. State, Mary Baldwin, St. Andrews, University of North Carolina, East Carolina, Davidson, and Presbyterian Hospital. The college boys and girls have their earnings supplemented by the Educational Funds of the Home. The funds are already established and the memorial fund which continues makes possible the further education and training after graduation from the Home.

# UNDER THE STEEPLE

By REV. HUGH B. CARTER, JR.

*"God is our Father  
Man is our brother  
Earth is our Mother;  
Life is a mission and not  
A career.*

*Dominion is service,  
Its sceptre is gladness,  
The least is the greatest.  
Saving is living;  
Life is eternal and  
Love is its crown."*

The above lines from the pen and heart of the late Owen R. Lovejoy, Past President of the National Council of Social Work, Head of the National Child Labor Committee, and one of the nation's Great in the fight for a "square deal" for children. Dr. Lovejoy left the ministry of a church in Mount Vernon, New York to make the nation his parish as he launched his crusade to protect American children who were being used as laborers in the mines and mills and sweatshops and factories of America "on the move" in the first two decades of this century. He left the pulpit to enter the field of need among children who would never find their way to a place of worship on their one day of rest. He lived in Pullmans in days when the green curtains swayed through the night and soot sifted in through the screens; in hotel rooms and committee rooms, or wherever he could gather people to join in the defense of literally millions of children caught in the fast moving machinery of the industrial revolution in America.

These facts I have learned from the editor of "Somebody's Boy," one of his colleagues who survives the late minister and who carries on a ministry of another kind in defense of children who have been forgotten or deserted or otherwise deprived of a father's love and a mother's tenderness. The tribute to Owen Lovejoy who is now in the larger fold of the Great Shepherd prompts me to call attention to those who minister to children as Housemothers in Homes like Barium Springs.

The above little poem surely describes the creed of godly women in the lowly roll of "Housemother." Twenty-four hours a day she is on call for a dozen or more whom she calls "my boys" or "my girls." She has a small apartment in the cottage where the family does its living. Her door stays open. So does her heart. She hurts when they hurt, worries when they worry, and loves whether or not her love is returned. Most of the time it is. They come for a snack when they are hungry, and for solace when they are blue.

Housemothers are housemothers because they "have a calling" and for no other reason. Like all other parents, they are often misunderstood, mistreated, ignored, and unappreciated. Money doesn't pay us for being parents. It does not compensate for the times when growing boys and girls wear us down with loudness, or jab us with rudeness or deceive us with lies. Houseparents aren't in business for the money, but for the hope of an unseen return on whatsoever things are true, honest, just, pure, lovely, and of good report.

As a minister in a church on the campus of a children's home, I have come to know Housemothers at Barium Springs and on other campuses. One and all, they have my admiration and respect. They are a dedicated task force on the firing line in the everlasting battle that goes on to save the bodies and souls of children who have fallen upon hard times or evil days. God bless them, every one.

### BOARD PRESIDENT REPORTS TO SYNOD

Expenses for the year amounted to \$326,680 leaving a surplus of \$19,082. The Annual Report and study by The Duke Endowment indicates that we spent an average of \$1,603 per child during this fiscal year. This compares very favorably with other institutions of comparable quality and size.

In addition to the normal operations of the home, certain capital expenditures were undertaken this year. The water line has been completed on the campus and every building has the use of city water. The staff quarters are complete and four of the five units are now occupied. The swimming pool is nearing completion and should be available for use by June 1. The replacement of Howard Cottage is progressing very satisfactorily and should be available for occupancy before the end of 1961. The completion of all these projects are eagerly anticipated by the entire campus, students and administration, and are expected to bring much happiness to all concerned for many years to come.

#### Conclusion

The members of the staff of the home continue to render excellent service. It is amazing how much good work is done by the nearly five dozen people who are charged with responsibility of caring for the children. Serving beyond the call of duty and investing in the name of the church are the labors of love from those who serve Barium Springs. Securing adequate replacements for those who retire and those who decide to make changes is exceedingly difficult.

The Superintendent should be highly commended for the exceptional job which he has done. And a special commendation should be extended for his attention and guidance in behalf of the high school graduates who wish to move on to the fields of higher education. In this respect, the "Educational Fund" is a life saver for the children. Last September there were 30 children from the home in school or training in 18 different institutions, most of which are in North Carolina.

Finally, I would take this opportunity to thank all members of the Board for their loyalty and devotion to this institution. The two regular meetings held during the year were well attended and each member contributed his full attention and talents to the problems at hand.

## TROUTMAN POSTS 20-6 NPC WIN

Troutman's Bobcats, reaching the halfway point of their 1961 schedule, notched their second victory of the North Piedmont Conference campaign last night, assuring Coach R. G. Calhoun's chances of a better finish than their 1960 venture.

The Bobcats, outdistanced statistically except through the air and in the final score by West Rowan's Falcons last night, had to come from behind to claim a 20-6 triumph.

West Rowan drew first scoring blood in the second period when the Falcons made good use of a Troutman gamble. The Bobcats, backed up with a first and 10 on the Troutman 10, went to the air and Charlie McLean's aerial was intercepted by Bill Hall of the Fal-

cons on the Troutman 26. Wayne Klutz boomed over from two yards out in a slam over guard, but a penalty nullified the run for the point.

Troutman took the ensuing kickoff and marched back on a 64-yard drive to go ahead for keeps on End Braxton Bridgers' placement. A 33-yard pass from McLean to Dale Rogers picked up the touchdown to climax the drive, featured by McLean runs and a 27-yard sprint by wingback Johnny Murdock. Bridgers' boot gave the Bobcats a 7-6 halftime lead.

Troutman took the second half kickoff and marched it downfield on a 73-yard sustained drive. A 13-yard pass from McLean to Bridgers featured the drive, with McLean

plunging the final yard into paydirt. Bridgers again booted the point for a 14-6 margin.

West Rowan moved out to their own 43 in their best effort in the third period, but fumbled and Bridgers recovered for the Bobcats. In the fourth period, West's best penetration was to the Troutman 44. A defensive lapse in the first half resulted in Bill Dulin's forwards being keyed up for Troutman's second half effort that pulled the Bobcats away for keeps.

Troutman's TD in the fourth period came after a pass interception. Mike Morgan pulled in the theft at the Troutman 44 and lugged it back to the West Rowan 20. A ground attack, with McLean (Continued on Page 3)

# UNDER THE STEEPLE

We have just observed our Fall Week of Spiritual Enrichment, led this year by the Hon. Judge Walter Scott Criswell of Jacksonville, Florida. Judge Criswell has received several national awards for his work with children during the past forty years, more than thirty of which he presided over the Juvenile Court in Jacksonville. He is a kindly, simple, strong man, a man whose first love is the Christ who said, "Let the little children come unto me . . ." Each week, he publishes a bulletin entitled "Somebody's Boy," in which he recounts stories of yesteryear when he was in the business of raising children (he was a founder of the Jacksonville Boy's Home), and giving counsel to some 50,000 boys and girls who looked with questioning eyes into his face in the Children's Court. In a recent issue, he tells the following story entitled "Asme."

My palatial sleeping quarters were not so far away but that I could hear "Biddy" wheezing and whimpering in his bed in the Little Boys' Dormitory.

He had childhood asthma. He had no parents. His relatives were shiftless, shifty and uncertain.

He was pitiful out there sleepless in the dark and with that wheezy, choking sensation—while the other boys were sprawled and relaxed in blissful sleep.

He knew I would come. And I did come. My therapy was to bundle him up in an old shapeless red bath robe which had been 'bestowed' on us and for which Biddy had a strong liking. Boys have strange, strong likings, don't they?

When he saw me coming in the dim night light, he would smother his wheezing, smile with eyes made bright by tears, and hold up his arms to be picked up and 'wropped' in the faded bath robe.

Our therapy was rather simple. We would go into our palatial quarters, first hereinbefore and above mentioned, subside into a big soft chair before the open fireplace, with Biddy on my well upholstered bosom and lap, and look at the fire. And there would be an application of Vicks Vapor Rub with the warmth folded in by raggedy but warm robe.

The fire would flame and flicker, something like our conversation. And everything was quiet and cozy.

Biddy liked to talk about his home in a nearby town. It was "on the Rail Road" and when the trains came roaring along "you thought they were coming right inter the house."

He liked the old-fashioned Mogul whistles that moaned and made mournful music which one could hear "miles before the train got there." It was so much better than "them air compression whistles that go 'Blap, Blap, and don't have no music in them."

"Cap, don't you like them whistles better than them new 'Blap Blap' ones?"

Of course I did.

Then I remember we discussed such metaphysical matters as "Where's Heaven, Cap?" He wanted to know because they told him his mother went there. They told him this a "long time ago—he just could remember."

I dodged in a manner worthy of a professional Theologian. "Why Biddy, Heaven is where God and your mamma is—and where all good little boys will go when they get old and die."

"But is it a *place*?" he asked, looking up at me, wide-eyed.

So, I had to say it was a "place" of some kind, not like any place we know about, but a place where every one was kind to every one else, and no one ever died, and where all the families came together and knew each other—and so on.

I noticed that Biddy had grown limp and his breath came easily and regularly, and his eyes were closed.

So I gently rolled him up in his battered bathrobe, and softly put him in his little bed and tucked the covers around him. He sighed, but he didn't wake up.

Maybe he was trying to figure out my sketchy specifications about Heaven.

Sometimes, in the therapy sessions, we would both go to sleep. Then the Little Captain would gently wake me up and see that I put Biddy to bed.

## CHICKEN AND "BIDDY"

Who was "Biddy"?

Well he was a motherless child with an older brother called Chicken. Chicken was so named because when he came to our haphazard, but relatively happy family, his face was scratched "Jes like a chicken had flew at him and scratched him," as one of our youngsters announced.

So he was called "Chicken." What could the little brother be called but "Biddy."

I really can't remember their other and real names—nor all the details of their coming to or leaving the "Home."

But I know Biddy grew up and outgrew his "Asme" and became a man and used to look at me affectionately and shyly.

Of course we, being men, never mentioned my rocking him to sleep. But we never forgot it.

Somebody else was his mother,  
Somebody else was his dad.

Some thoughtless father  
Had found him a bother—  
A smilin' faced, wee, lonesome lad.

Somebody left him to someone,  
A chip on life's treacherous sea.  
His wail was a song  
'N he didn't go wrong  
When his little arms reached up to me.

He wasn't what you'd call a beauty,  
He was sickly, the poor little chap,  
And the whole day was closed  
When he wrinkled his nose  
'N went sound asleep on my lap.

He hasn't much chance to be president  
With a dad who's a fellow like me,  
But Johnny's a boy  
Who can take pain 'n joy  
With the same kind o' smile, don't you see.

'N somewhere ahead is the glory  
Which only together we'll win.  
He'll win it, that lad,  
'N I'll be the dad.  
Of the man his real dad could o' been.

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## Hollingsworth Conducts In-Service Training

During the week of October 30, Mr. Hansel H. Hollingsworth, associate director of the Group Child Care Project, will be at Barium Springs conducting on-campus staff training.

"The Group Child Care Project is five years old. It was begun in 1956 to provide a service consisting of on-campus staff training (with particular emphasis for houseparents) and consultation for institutions within a designated area. The Project arranges for a consultant to spend 4-5 days on the grounds of each institution and, in addition, to assist throughout the year in any other ways that would be helpful. A variety of teaching approaches have been developed by consultants and are geared to the needs, the personnel and the basic philosophy of each institution being served. Most usually, each executive works out with the consultant the general pattern and approach which the service will follow within his institution. The consultant attempts to fit himself into the life of this organization during the time that he is on the grounds and, from the vantage point, studies and considers with staff members the concerns, reactions, techniques and questions that they may have. He does so in the light of the experience of other institutions, knowledge of human development and child welfare, and general understanding of the know-how and skills most needed by staff workers."

Barium Springs feels extremely fortunate to be a part of the project and in having Mr. Hollingsworth to conduct the in-service training program on the campus.

## Excerpts . . .

(Taken from concluding remarks by Dr. Alan Keith-Lucas to a workshop for administrators of Children's Institutions held under the auspices of the Child Welfare League of America and the School of Social Work, University of North Carolina.)

What can I say to you at the end of this week? I could, with perfect truth, tell you what you already know: that if any man wants to know the real meaning of the expression "Christian Fellowship" he should come to one of these Workshops in Chapel Hill. For however wide we spread our net, from Kansas to Puerto Rico, from Miami to New York to Chicago, we always find in Chapel Hill a group that has a common steadfast purpose and yet a thousand different ways of reaching it; that can disagree vocally and courageously without losing sight for one moment of its common bond; that can argue without carping and differ without trying to score on the other fellow; that never puts on a show to make a good impression but shares its mistakes as well as its successes and that treats each other's ideas with tolerance and respect.

I would like to re-emphasize a few very general convictions that these Workshops seem to me to underline.

That this is a most exciting and promising field.

That group-care is something to be offered proudly, sensitively and with conviction to those who need it at some time of their lives more than they need anything else.

That the field offers an ever-increasing challenge.

That this is a sphere for those who have both a sense of calling and a keen brain, both feeling and judgment, both the right spirit and the practical ability to put their ideals into practice.

That the church, as it affirms both its concept of the right end of man and of its responsibility to make use of all God's gifts in pursuing this, is adding a depth to our understanding of people.

Let me go back for a moment to an ancient writer whose work I have been re-reading these past few weeks and who had perhaps one of the most intensive and practical

views of mankind and his world that has ever been presented—Saint Thomas Aquinas. As I read him, Saint Thomas believed that there were three necessary pre-requisites to right action. One was Reason—rigorous thinking, the sort of thinking that I hope we have been doing this week. One was Grace—all that we know by Divine revelation and through our faith. And the third was a virtue which he called "prudence" or "practical wisdom." This is the ability to take what we know by reason or what our convictions tell us, to recognize its validity and yet to apply it in a very practical way to the limitations of our situations, to make compromises knowing that they are compromises but yet necessary, and never to rationalize a compromise into a principle. And so let us get back to our jobs and, as best God may permit us, put our reason, our convictions and our common-sense to work.

## UNDER THE STEEPLE

*Thanksgiving in the Midst of Peril*

For fourteen days and nights the small ship was tossed about on the dark waves of the Mediterranean. All hope of being saved was abandoned. Cargo had been thrown overboard, and even the tackle had been claimed by the sea. The end seemed to be at hand. Then a small man, one of the passengers, gathered the others about him and took bread, and giving thanks to God in the presence of all he broke it and began to eat.

Paul was an old hand at giving thanks in the midst of peril. Many a time, he looked death in the face; on five different occasions he was whipped within an inch of his life by merciless hands that wielded the lash; three times he was clubbed; once he was stoned; in chains he wrote, "In everything by prayer and supplication, *With Thanksgiving*, let your requests be made known unto God, and the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus."

Our Lord Jesus, on the night in which he was betrayed, with the cross just hours away, took bread and gave thanks. It is the way of faith to be thankful, even in the midst of peril.

Thanksgiving Day, 1961 is a day of peril for the majority of the human race. We are dismayed at the course which events have taken since the end of the Second World War. Ever and ever closer we slide toward the brink of world disaster; yet we are not without cause for giving thanks. For our faith is rooted in a cross, and that cross, though stained with the blood of the One Altogether Lovely, is the symbol of the sure victory of Good over Evil, the guarantee that in the midst of all the depravity and sinfulness of man is the Savior God.

And so, in the midst of peril, we also take bread on this Thanksgiving Day 1961, and assured that nothing shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus, we give thanks.

## THANKSGIVING IS THE TIME

For more than half a century the Presbyterian Church has been stretching forth its hand to children, bringing them to Barium Springs where they could find shelter, security, happiness, protection, and training. During this time members of the Synod of North Carolina have been stretching forth their hands to make contributions to Barium Springs for the care of these boys and girls. It has been and continues to be a magnificent story.

The Thanksgiving season is now upon us and the people who, through their love for Jesus Christ invest in the lives of boys and girls, will be making their offering through the Church. There is no finer manifestation of pure love than when a man takes his own money and invests it in the life of a boy or girl whom he has never seen and whom he probably will never see. What a grand way to share the work of Christ's Kingdom.

The boys and girls of the Home, while depending on the people of the Church for their contributions to the Home, nevertheless, do their part in the Home. This has been a busy summer. Three large trench silos have been filled with silage for winter feeding. The hay barns are bulging with hay that has been cut, baled and stored. The corn is harvested and is in the crib. The potatoes have been stored in the potato house. The apples have been picked and stored for winter use. The peaches also have been canned and frozen. The gardens, producing vegetables, have served the tables and filled the cannery and the freezer locker. All of this came through the work of the boys and girls along with the members of the staff who have been busy since early spring helping to take care of the needs of the Home. So, it is a blending of faith and works. It is the faith of these children in the people who provide for them and it is their work in the life of the Home such as running the laundry, washing the dishes, cooking, caring for the Infirmary, maintaining the campus, working on the farm, caring for the orchard, and looking after the dairy and all the other activities.

The greatest thrill that comes to anyone in this operation is the thrill of having a part. Let Thanksgiving time be the occasion of your investment and bear in mind that the Home, while it provides a great deal of its own food from the farm, has manifold expenses that cannot be met unless the people of the Synod give generously.

It will take time, effort, and organization on the part of the Churches and Church Schools to afford the people information and to secure their interest in and their gifts for the Home. Barium is confident that the whole Church will not fail to make provisions for its work on the campus.

## THANKSGIVING SERVICE IN CAMPUS CHURCH

On Thanksgiving morning the bell in the tower will call the whole family together for worship. From all the cottages the boys and girls will merge their paths at the underpass and approach the Little Joe's Presbyterian Church where the cross of Christ lifted high in the air signifies His presence and His forgiveness. The robed choir under the direction of Mrs. Clinton Clontz will lead the congregation in the singing of the Thanksgiving hymns.

The minister, Reverend Hugh B. Carter, Jr. will lead the congregation in the Thanksgiving worship and all will join together in making the regular Thanksgiving offering for the Home.

After the services there will be leisurely visiting between the students with their friends and relatives until time for the dinner in the dining room. At high noon a special Thanksgiving dinner will be served with turkey and all the

trimmings, thanks to the many thoughtful friends who remember Barium Springs at this season. The afternoon and evening will be spent in recreation and visiting with friends and loved ones. The day will close with sincere gratitude to Almighty God for His wonderful care and for the many friends of the Home who, especially, at Thanksgiving time remember the work of the church in the lives of boys and girls.
