CONFESSION-A MODERN-DAY JONAH

I sat on a straight chair in my room in the crumbling Soviet-era hotel in Krasnodon, an east Ukrainian city of over 120,000. I was exhausted, cold, hungry, and just about as miserable as I had ever been. Out the front window, a twenty-foot statue of Lenin would have been visible — if the streetlights had been working that night, which they weren't.

Krasnodon is the easternmost point of Ukraine, and the center of the city lies only 10 kilometers from the Russian border. I was there to help two young Bible College graduates organize a church in what is described as a "spiritual desert." In east Ukraine it is possible to travel 300 kilometers without ever passing an evangelical church.

To reach that dingy, damp room, I had flown nearly 6,000 miles, then traveled for 21 hours on the train. It was Thursday, my third night in Ukraine, and I was desperate for a good night's sleep. Monday night I had dozed on the airplane; Tuesday night had been spent tossing and turning, fighting a seven-hour jet lag. Wednesday night I had passed on the train, sharing a stiflingly hot six-foot compartment with three Ukrainian men

The best word to describe the train ride was "boring." Anticipating a long journey, I had brought my Bible, a book to read, and pen and pad for study, but less than an hour out of Kiev it was full dark, and the forty-watt bulb in our compartment made reading impossible. So I sat and stared out the window at the darkened landscape and, like Paul and his companions during the storm at sea, "wished for the day."

After several hours of this, we lay down for sleep. The sleeping accommodations consisted of four hard benches upon which were unrolled thin pads. I was dressed for the unexpectedly cold weather outside, not for the stifling

compartment, so my sleep consisted mainly of tossing and turning and sweating — for nearly twelve hours. When the sun came up, I looked at myself in the mirror and saw terminally tousled hair to go with the stale dried sweat I could smell on my body.

I surveyed the tiny, filthy, ill-equipped toilet on the train car; it did not even have running water. I learned that, if you really have to, you can brush your teeth, wash out your mouth, shave, rinse your razor, comb your hair, and wash your hands with a nine-ounce paper cup of drinking water. I spent the last six hours of the trip looking forward to the hotel room I knew was waiting, a good wash, a proper bathroom, and a warm bed.

When we arrived at the end of the interminable train ride, we were still forty kilometers from Krasnodon. The rest of the journey was made in an ancient, decrepit "Moskvitch" automobile — jokingly referred to as a Russian Mercedes — which provided cramped transportation for five grown men. We stopped at the driver's home in a tiny coal-mining village for lunch, then proceeded on to our destination. Again, all I could think about was a good bath, a proper toilet, and a warm bed.

Finally, about dark, we arrived at the hotel. They had reserved for the Ukrainian evangelist and me the best room in the best hotel. The room — actually a suite — had a sitting room with an ancient, one-channel television, a bedroom with two single beds separated from the sitting room by a curtained archway, and a bathroom. I admit, it was the latter I was most interested in.

As I walked into the bath, the harsh reality of the situation hit me. There was no heat in the entire hotel. There was no faucet accessible to the huge porcelain tub and there was only a tiny trickle of cold water from the

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spigot on the sink. There was not even any water connected to the toilet, which had be flushed with a bucket. There was no toilet seat. I walked back into the sitting area and sat.

I could hear my companion in the bedroom area changing into his night clothes, but I had no desire to change. I had no desire to sleep. I had no desire to do anything that would constitute acceptance of the conditions as I sat there, mentally rehearsing before the Lord all my grievances. I will confess, it was not my finest hour.

In a few minutes, my companion parted the curtain, made a steeple of his fingers, and said, "Molyem?" which is Russian for, "We pray?" Now, the last thing in the world I wanted to do was pray; I was mad with God. So I knelt shivering on the freezing floor of that room and went through the motions of prayer. As my roommate bombarded heaven in his language, I complained to God in mine. I complained about the food I had been served. I complained about having to share my room with a man who spoke no English. I complained about the train ride. I complained about the room, the cold, and the bathroom — especially about the bathroom. I reminded God how far I had traveled and how much I was sacrificing just to be there; I expected a little divine gratitude. I said, "Lord, don't you care about me at all? Has your famous compassion dried up?"

And I seemed to hear the voice of God saying, "Jonah." I wondered why God wanted me to think about Jonah. Then I heard it again: "Jonah." But this time I was aware that God was not **reminding** me of Jonah; He was **addressing** me as Jonah; God was telling me that I was acting like Jonah.

I protested, "But, Lord! I didn't run the other way like Jonah. I came where you sent me. I WANT to be here." But even as I was saying these words, I remembered that the story of Jonah didn't end with the fish vomiting him up on the shore, nor with his preaching to Nineveh and the people repenting; it ended with his sitting on a hillside overlooking the city, complaining because the vine that had shaded his head from the out sun had died. It ended with God saying to Jonah, "You are concerned about the vine that made you comfortable; I am concerned about 120,000 people who don't know their right hand from their left."

And I realized what God was trying to say to me. Here I sat more concerned about the comfort of my body than about the more than 120,000 people right outside my hotel that didn't know Jesus. God told me, "I do care, and I do have compassion; I care for those who live without my love, and I have compassion for those who will die without knowing my mercy."

Something withing me broke, and I began to weep as God reminded me why I was there. He said, "I didn't bring you nearly 7,000 miles to take a shower or eat certain foods or live in comfort. I brought you here to stand in the gap between Calvary and people who are

dying in their sins. I brought you here to agonize with me over the lost, not complain to me about your own discomfort."

I thought about that city, about hungry children, about out-of-work miners, about the ones who worked twelve hours a day, but over the last several months had only been paid a few dollars. I thought about the huge factory I had seen, gutted with fire in a mafia feud, and the people who once had jobs there. And I wept, not for the cold of the room, the lack of amenities, or the stench rising from my body, but for the souls of people who don't know their right hand from their left.

In a flash I understood: I was a soldier on a hostile field of battle, and it was high time I girded my loins and entered into the fray. I don't know how Jonah's story ended, if he repented for his lack of compassion or not. But I do know what happened with THIS Jonah: God gave me a massive attitude adjustment there on that cold floor, and I went on to not only tolerate my stay in that city, but also enjoy it and be sorry to see it end.

And now I wonder: how many Jonahs are there among us? How many of us constantly bombard God with complaints about our lot in life? How many of us are there to whom God would say, "Forget about the comfort of your body and shed tears for those who do not know my love"?

**My troubles were not over. When we finished praying and I went to the bathroom to prepare for bed, even the trickle of water had stopped; the only water in the room was the bucketful for flushing the toilet. But I just smiled and dipped my hands in the bucket and was grateful. The next day I would walk about ten miles handing out tracts and inviting people to services, and have the blisters to prove it. Saturday I would get soaked to the skin and stay wet all day, then emerge from the evening service to a fairly heavy snowfall, conditions for which I had brought neither clothing nor shoes. We would return to the room and find that the weather had cut off the electricity to the hotel. Sunday morning, we only had about three inches of water in the bucket for all the needs of both of us, and then there was another twenty-hour train ride to face.

**But, you see, none of that even registered on my awareness as hardship, because in two services in that spiritual desert, we had seen seventeen souls saved — not the whole city, but a good beginning for a fledgling church. All that mattered was that seventeen people came to know the love and mercy of Him who is now THEIR Heavenly Father, just as He is mine and yours. There is no price-tag that can express the worth of that.

**Since returning to my comfortable lifestyle, this modern-day "Jonah" has prayed many times — Father, if ever again you need an evangelist in Krasnodon, "Here and I, Lord; send me." The going is worth the price — and it's no hardship at all.

GRAND OPENING!! We often see this sign in front of a new business establishment, or we might read about this kind of celebration for an opening event. Anytime we see this statement, we know a new be-

ginning is being featured.

Well, here we are at the GRAND OPENING OF 1998! Every new year that dawns offers us the opportunity for new beginnings. At this time of year, we reflect on what has occurred in our homes, churches, businesses or relationships during the past year. Field Ministry Strategy

We intend to consistently communicate with pastors and leaders in the local churches within a structure that encourages spiritual growth, continuity, and action among their men. In order to effectively serve, we have established a volunteer position known as a Key Man.

Position

The Key Man is, with the approval of his pastor, the critical link between the men's ministry of his church and Promise Keepers. He should be a lay leader or a staff pastor. He serves at the pleasure of his pastor and local church. The Key Man exists to voluntarily serve in two capacities within Field Ministry.

1. Under the direction and authority of his pastor, he accepts a vital leadership role to effectively initiate and/or offer direction, organization, and support to the men's ministry of his church.

2. He is conduit for resources including materials, regional conferences, and training seminars provided by Promise Keepers and other contributing men's ministries.

Pastor Manuel Castaneda and the Conference Loan Committee have informed me that in order to process their loan, they must be guaranteed the sewer hook-up The first estimate was \$22,000.00. After discussion with the city of Tarboro, Pastor Castaneda informs me the city has agreed for the church to put in their own septic system. This coupled with the necessary tree removal is estimated to around six to eight thousand dollars. The church must raise these unexpected and additional funds. Praise the Lord for the reduction in the original amount.

The La Roca congregation is our largest Hispanic congregation. Praise the Lord for their outreach and their commitment to the Pentecostal Holiness Church. I am putting out an appeal to the individuals and churches of the Conference. If we can quickly raise these additional funds, the Conference Loan fund can execute the loan. The church can continue to move forward.

Reverend Hartwell Ray Stewart September 21, 1917 – November 9, 1997

Funeral services for Reverend Hartwell Ray Stewart were conducted at Benson Pentecostal Holiness Church on Wednesday, November 12 by Superintendent Elwood Long, Reverend J. Doner Lee, and Reverend L. B. Collins.

He was born September 21, 1917, in Taylors, South Carolina, to Jacob and Miriam Beacham Stewart. Brother Stewart was converted to Christ on April 20, 1938, at Holmes Memorial Church in Greenville, South Carolina. He graduated from Mountain View High School in 1934 and earned his ThB at Holmes College of the Bible. He received his B.A. at Furman University.

Among his family survivors include his wife Della Grace and two sons.

Reverend Harvey Morris June 13, 1911 – November 11, 1997

Reverend William Harvey Morris was born in Pitt County on June 13, 1911, to Reverend Ed and Nora Morris. He responded to the call of God as a young man. The following is a poem that is a tribute to Brother Morris:


Daddy

Four of the five town board members, including the town's mayor, were ministers in the Holiness Pentecostal Church. Three of them, Mayor Luetta Morris, Elton Lancaster, and J. Doner Lee, retired from politics when a new board was sworn in on Dec. 1. Wiley T. Clark is the only returning minister.

But a few ministers are nothing new to Falcon.

The small town about 16 miles north of Fayetteville is the birthplace of the Pentecostal Holiness Church. It is home to the headquarters of the church's North Carolina Conference. Pentecostal Holiness churches can be found all over the United States.

"The church is really growing, and it all started right here," Clark said.

Hundreds of Pentecostal Holiness congregations from the Southeast come to Falcon each year for the annual Harvest Train, a Thanksgiving celebration and fund-raiser for the children's home. North Carolina congregations gather in the summer for the annual camp meeting in June.

Many ministers come to Falcon through their work with the conference office, children's home, or retire here because they are drawn to the small town.

"There isn't a street in Falcon without one or two ministers on it," Wayne G. Lucas said.

Lucas is the only board member who is not a minister. He is now the town's new mayor.

"He's a minister, he's just not licensed," Clark said about Lucas at the December retirement and swearing-in ceremony.

Lucas didn't feel left out as the only board member who is not a minister. Instead, he said he enjoyed the smooth workings of the council. He's not sure if that's all because of the influence of the ministers, but "that certainly didn't hurt it a bit."

All of the board members said they enjoyed a sense of harmony when working together.

"I have served on many boards and commissions, but

none with more harmony or unity," said J. Doner Lee, a Falcon native who served on the board for 10 years and was called to the ministry in 1950. "We tried through the years to work for others."

"The council had such unity," Luetta Morris said. "It never had a divided vote on any issue."

With Morris at the helm, the council built a town hall, brought water to Falcon, and is now debt-free. All of the streets except for one are in good repair. The council has put in an application for drainage and sewer.

Morris, Lee, and Elton Lancaster were recognized for their service to the town on Dec. 1 and given plaques and flowers. Morris joked that the retirement reception was so nice, "We might run again."

Lee said the retirements are official, but you're never completely closed off from either the job of minister or town commissioner. The job of pastor, especially, is never done.

"You have a lot to do – funerals, homecomings, that kind of thing," Lee said. "You're never retired. I'll never say that I have retired. I trust that I have refired."

Lancaster, a pastor for 31 years, said he still "fills in on weekends," serving as a guest minister about once a month. He said he's enjoyed working on the board. He has served off and on for six years. He retired to Falcon about 11 years ago.

"We had a wonderful working agreement," he said. "I really enjoyed it."

And what about all of those ministers?

"I hardly know what to say about that," Lancaster said.

But one thing is sure. There's no getting away from them in Falcon, and that's the way most people like it.

"Falcon was formed because of the church, and you can't separate them," Morris said.

New town council members, in addition to Lucas and Clark, are Clifton L. Turpin, Jr., G. L. Draughon, and Sherry Stephenson.

LINES FROM LINDA...

Rev. and Mrs. Clifton L. Turpin have been such people in my life. Although I am sure this edition of The Evangel will have other tributes to Brother Turpin, I want to share my own tribute as well.

The Turpins came to pastor at Holly Hill in 1955 when I was 13 years old. They were a young, dynamic couple full of enthusiasm. Brother Turpin's sermons were anointed; and young people, as well as the adults, flocked to the altars after hearing him deliver the Word of the Lord. His messages were simple - yet powerful. His style of

ministry was very relevant to the youth, and he built a rapport with us that influenced each of us for the rest of our lives. The Turpins were not only influential within the church, but also in the community. Even though they commuted to our congregation, they still found time to visit in the homes. I can recall the times when our family enjoyed having them for meals. Moma was a great "country" cook, and she would fill the table with fresh vegetables, country ham or pork chops, and those delicious homemade biscuits. Brother Turpin especially enjoyed them with her pear preserves. Although we had no fancy china or silverware, they made themselves right at home and felt like family.

I so much enjoyed the times the Turpins sang at our services, and they recognized my love for music. He offered me opportunities to participate in the services. His father had a tent ministry at that time; and I recall Brother Turpin and my brother, Jimmy, bringing his father's organ to use in our church. It was then that I learned to play the organ.

Recognizing the ability of this young minister, the conference elected him Christian Education Director in 1956. Their stay with us had been much, much too short. Our church family felt a great loss when we learned they would be leaving. We often laugh about the fact that for many years after he left, every time a pastoral vote was taken, there was always a vote for C. L. Turpin. One of our oldest members of the church never could accept the fact that Clifton would not come back to pastor Holly Hill again.

I attended youth camps during Brother Turpin's term of C.E. Director. Here again, right at his side was his beautiful and talented wife, Janice. I saw the impact they had on hundreds of other young people's lives as they served in that role.

They moved on to other areas of service and moved away from North Carolina, but they kept their ties here. If they were anywhere near us, they visited. If we were anywhere near therm, we visited their home. We stayed in touch as they added Cliff, Jr. and Steve to their family. When Joe and I were planning our wedding, we knew it would not be complete without Brother Turpin being a part of it. He was scheduled to be out of state on church business and could not be home in time for our rehearsal, but he left early to get back in time to assist our pastor, Rev. John Slye, in performing our wedding ceremony. When Moma died, he assisted with her funeral as she had requested.

One very special memory is of the Lifeliners Convention in Bakersfield, California. At this time, C. L. Turpin was director of Lifeliners International. My sisters and I were elected delegates to that convention (thanks to Rev. Harvey Morris); and Brother Turpin asked us, The Morris Sisters, to provide special music for the convention. We were so honored to be invited to perform there. Our participation in that convention opened the door for many other opportunities of ministry for us. We sang for numerous conference functions and were invited to many of the churches in

North Carolina Conference when we

returned home.

When the Turpins came back to North Carolina to serve at Falcon Children's home, I was privileged to serve on the FCH Board of Directors. I saw firsthand the dedication and devotion they had to that ministry. There was the same fervency there that I had seen in them as a young couple at Holly Hill. Brother Turpin gave himself fully to that work - again with Janice at his side.

Many of us stayed with them through

the hard times that followed. We visited him and tried to encourage him - yet more often than not found him encouraging us. We wrote him to let him know that he was not forsaken - and his notes back to us were upbeat and positive. During his period of illness, we have been blessed when we visited in their home. The last visit Joe and I had with him was just before Christmas. He enjoyed recalling the good memories. He also continued to praise Janice for

standing by his side. He chose to take the high road and not be defeated. On December 30, his final victory was won when God called him home.

I believe Clifton Turpin experienced some of what Job experienced in his life. It seems that all was stripped from him and many of his friends could not understand the truth of it all. Just one difference - never did Janice tell him to curse God and die. She stood there with her feet firmly planted on the Solid Ground with encouragement and support. They, together, determined to be victorious Christians.

At Brother Turpin's funeral service on Friday, January 2, Rev. J. Doner Lee read very appropriate scripture from II Samuel 3:38: "...know ye not that there is a prince and a great man fallen this day..." Clifton Turpin's body is buried in the Falcon Cemetery, but his spirit lives on. The effects of his ministry live on in the lives of thousands of people around the world because he was a bearer of the gospel message of Jesus Christ. It is because of such people as the Turpins that my life has been influenced to Christian service.

Some people come into our lives and quickly go. Some stay for awhile and leave footprints in our hearts and we are never, ever the same.

Thank you, Clifton and Janice Turpin, for the footprints you have left in my heart.

HUMOR YOUR WM MEETING...

One of the keys to successful WM meetings is a sense of community, and nothing bonds like shared humor. Evidenced in a number of psychological studies monitoring group dynamics, laughter can break down defenses and provide common ground for more self-disclosure within groups of people. Laughter also releases pent-up emotions and affords people the opportunity to forget their worries. Some ideas for building relationships with giggles in your group are:

- Draw pictures. At one meeting ask everyone to do a
 portrait of their personality; then in a spirit of not
 taking themselves seriously, show everyone's art and
 award prizes to the best pieces.
- Share a flash from the past. Ask everyone to bring their high school graduation picture (or picture from their younger days) to meeting. Out-of-date clothing and hair styles get everyone laughing as you reveal how you have changed...or not. Share stories about some embarrassing moments of the teen years. This will keep people chuckling and allow you to be vulnerable with one another.
- Have a costume night. Encourage each person to be very original. Have each one explain her costume.

Use discernment. A joke or story understood by only a few people in your group can do more harm than good. So can humor at someone else's expense. The key to injecting humor is making it fun for all.

It's the TV Guide. As pages are turned, what shall they see? Oh, what does it matter - turn on the TV! So they open the book in which they confide (No, not the Bible; it's the TV Guide.) The Word of God is seldom read Maybe a verse e'er they fall into bed Exhausted and sleepy and tired as can be; Not from reading the Bible, from watching TV. So then back to the table, side by side, Is the Holy Bible and the TV Guide. No time for prayer; no time for the Word. The plan of salvation is seldom heard. Forgiveness of sin so full and free Is found in the Bible...not on TV!





From the Superintendent

THE BLESSED HOPE

"We believe in the imminent, personal, premillennial second

coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and love and wait for his appearance." This is the Article of Faith listed as number 13 in *The Manual* of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church. However, this is not just theory or supposition. It is a vital fact of our faith. We love and look for the return of our Lord at any moment. Amid all the other emphases of the day in church growth, prophecies, and spiritual warfare, we must not forget the blessed hope of the glorious appearing of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ. These other emphases are not to be despised or ignored. We must never lose sight of the glorious fact that Jesus Christ our Lord could, at any moment, be our coming King in immediate reality.

With that in mind, I write this article:

There was once a farmer by the name of William Miller. He lived in the nineteenth century and began a particular strain of religion. One of the notorious marks of his religion was an intense belief that Jesus Christ will return. He was known for setting dates for the return of the Lord. He and his followers, known as Millerites, often met for camp meetings, revivals, etc. During one of these meetings, a date was set for the Lord to return. The Millerites decided that they would rally around this prediction regardless of public reaction.

The date was announced. Jesus would return between March 21, 1842, and March 21, 1843. During that particular year, they were to prepare themselves for the arrival of our Lord. He was sure to come during that time. But He didn't. Disappointment swept through the Millerite crowd. Though Miller himself seemed unchanged and unchallenged by the failure of his prediction, he simply said he had miscalculated. So he sharpened his pen and refigured the details and proceeded to set another date. The announcement was made on August 12, 1844, that Jesus would come between October 20 and October 22 of 1844. Mr. Miller told his people, "Get ready for the end of the world."

The time drew near for October 20 through 22, and a sign was noticed on a Philadelphia store window:

This shop will be closed in honor of the King of Kings who will appear about the 20th of October. Get ready friends, to crown Him Lord of all.

Some 200 Millerites sold or gave away their possessions and prepared their wardrobe for the soon coming King of Kings. They gathered and waited in white robes for His coming. And they waited, and they waited, and they waited. October 20 came and passed them by. Also the 21st, the 22nd, and of course the 23rd. Five years later, William Miller died. I think perhaps the wisest statement that was ever made by Millerites was put on his tombstone. It reads, "At the appointed time the end shall be." I think they finally had arrived at some good theology. Not on March 21, 1842, or October 20, 1844, not on March 15, 1998, or even the first day of the year 2000, but at the appointed time the end shall be.

It may not be when you or I think it might be. It may not even be as soon as you and I think it might be. Chances are good it will be sooner than most anticipate, but, again I repeat, no one can say when. To put it bluntly, date setters are out of date. They don't know what they're talking about. They always been out of date. They always will be. No one knows for sure. But there are a couple of things we do know. We can be sure of both.

The first thing we can know is that He certainly is coming again. He said so. I believe it. The second thing is, we can know that we are prepared to meet Him by having our names inscribed in the Lamb's Book of Life.

Titus 2:13 instructs us, "Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ." Hope! The late Dr. B. R. Lakin said, "Hope is well-founded, well-grounded expectation for the future." That's a good definition of hope. We might ask why is there such a lack of emphasis on the return of our Lord to catch away His waiting bride? I think that over emphasis on the sooness rather than the certainty and blessedness of His return is one of those problems that causes lack of teaching on this subject. Date setting was noted early in this century. Back in 1936 I understand that some were predicting that He would come within five years. Some even went so far, when I was a child growing up in eastern North Carolina, that they could tell who the

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anti-christ is. And then, the restoration of the nation of Israel has figured into the calculations of so many.

Recent attempts at date setting have been embarrassing. Edgar Whisenant's 88 Reasons Why The Rapture Will Be In 1988 is an example. Mr. Whisenant may have been honest, but he was wrong. He said September 14 was the day. He caused quite a stir, even among some believers. When Jesus did not return on September 14, 1988, Mr. Whisenant simply noted that he'd made a mistake, then he adjusted to the same date, 1989. He was wrong. All such attempts will always be wrong. A third reason I think there's a lack of emphasis on the return of our Lord is the average Christian is more concerned about living a comfortable lifestyle than he or she is about the rapture of the Bride of Christ.

However, our Lord Jesus Christ said in John 14:3, "I will come again." Charles Tolson, in his book, *Against The Night*, said, "The time smells of sunset".

There are at least 318 references in scripture about the second coming of our Lord. One verse out of every 25 in the New Testament alludes to His coming. The second coming of Christ is mentioned some eight times more than His first advent.

I want to give you four reasons why Jesus came the first time. He came, first of all, to reveal the Father. [John 14:9]. Second, He came to destroy the works of the devil. [1 John 3:8]. Third, He came to take away sin. [1 John 3:5]. And fourth, He came to prepare a bride for His return. [Hebrews 9:28]. I want you to note the sureness of His coming. We have Jesus' promise in John 14:3. He said, "I will come again." In Acts 1:11 read the words of the angels. They said this same Jesus shall come in like manner as you have seen Him go into glory. In I Thessalonians, chapter 4 verse 16, the Apostle Paul notes, "The Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout." There are many signs of His coming. We read of wars, pestilence, and earthquakes in Matthew 24, verses 6 and 7. I Timothy 4:1,2 informs us about an indifference among folk whose conscience has been seared. In James 5 verse 1-9, we see information regarding an amassing of wealth and greediness among the people of the planet Earth. In Matthew 24:14 we read about intensified missionary activities. In Luke 17, verses 26-30, we find a catalog of degrading gross immorality. In Luke 24, 25, 26, the writer talks about panic and perplexity as he records the words of Jesus. In Revelation 13, verses 1 through 18, we read about a central political power that will arise. In Luke 21:24 we read about the Jews return to Palestine.

In addition, we certainly need to notice the **suddenness** of His coming. We're told in I Corinthians 15, verse 51 and 52, that He will come in the twinkling of an eye. In Matthew 24:27, Jesus informs us that He'll come like lightning. Revelation 16:15 marks the fact that He will come as a thief. In Matthew 24:44 we are reminded that most people will not be expecting Him to come. "For in such an hour ye think not the Son of man cometh."

It will be well to notice the **subjects** of His coming. To **whom** will He come? For **whom** is He coming? Who will He catch away? The scriptures inform us readily that only those who are righteous will go with Him. Not righteous

in our own eyes or through our own vain efforts, but righteousness that is clothed upon us in the precious blood of Jesus Christ by the Holy Spirit. Those who are caught away will have their bodies glorified. Their redemption will be completed. Their fondest hopes will be realized. Our permanent abode will be solidly fixed. Who is the subject of His coming? It's the saint going to be satisfied. Our whole experience of salvation is so precious. We're saved by the grace of God. Sanctified by the precious blood of Jesus; separated by the presence of the Holy Spirit and the sanctified life. We live a life of service on this globe. And when He is through with us here, we will rise in His likeness and be fully satisfied with our heavenly abode. Who is it that He's coming for? He's coming for children who are joint heirs of God in Christ Jesus. We are going to our inheritance. Who is it that He's rapturing? We are servants who have toiled through the heat of the day, and we're coming to our rest at the end of the journey. We're told in the word of God in I Corinthians 15:58 that with all this in mind we are to be steadfast and unmoveable in the work of the Lord. For as much as we know that our labor in the Lord is not in vain. In II Timothy, chapter 4 verse 8, Paul reminds us that there's a crown of righteousness laid up for us in the Master's presence. Someone has suggested somewhere in the writings that I have read across the years that we are singing pilgrims who are going home. We're heading for the city of God; the city that has foundations whose builder and maker is the Lord. We're going to the Father's house of many mansions as recorded in John 14:2.

In conclusion we are soul winners who are going to shine. We have heard the call of the master. We have responded with a whole heart and we'll "occupy" till He comes according to the mandate in Luke 19:13. Our text in Titus, printed above in this article, enjoins us to purify ourselves in the blood of Jesus. We are to stand against evil because we're looking for the blessed hope and the glorious appearance of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are to be on the alert. We must watch and pray [read Mark 13:31-37]. H. L. Turner was right, over a hundred years ago, when he penned the following words:

It may be at morn, when the day is waking, When sunlight through darkness and shadows are breaking

That Jesus will come in the fullness of glory,
To receive from the world His own.
Oh joy! O life! should we go without dying.
No sickness, no sadness, no dread and no crying,
Caught up through the clouds with our Lord
into glory, when Jesus receives His own.

You ask me why I believe in Jesus' return. Because this blessed hope has become a vital force in my life. It has been so for the vast majority of my life. It shall be for the remainder of my sojourn here. Until He comes we will fight the good warfare against sin and evil. We will witness and be used of the Holy Spirit to win others to Christ. We will edify each other in the faith as we serve in the body of Christ. Until He comes we will be faithful to declare the whole Word of God and be used to build His kingdom here on earth as He enables us.

Are you looking for the Lord Jesus to come at any moment? If so, the blessed hope is an integral part of your life.

LINES FROM LINDA

The month of March marks the end of winter and brings to us the beauty of spring. The barren trees now begin to

bud out. The branches that have appeared lifeless now come alive with color. The birds return to inhabit the boughs. The grass turns green. Daffodils bloom. Although everything has seemingly been on hold for a season, God just breathes anew the breath of life into nature.

It is miraculous what is accomplished when God breathes on earth. We can look back to the account of the creation to see the wonder God wrought. It is especially awesome to me that God took dust from the ground, formed man from it, and then simply breathed into his nostrils the breath of life. By this act, man became a living soul.

Several years ago in our GEMS program at Holly Hill church, we had a certified CPR instructor hold a special training meeting for our girls and sponsors. We all listened intently to the teaching and then had the opportunity to practice on a mannequin. We followed the instructions and did all the right things; but, try as we may, we were unable to breathe life into that mannequin.

Some time after taking that course, I saw this practice put into use in an actual emergency. I had an appointment at the local high school that afternoon. In approaching the school, I saw a panic stricken group of people running toward a student who had just been hit by a car. I pulled my car to the roadside; and by the time I got out, the physical education teacher had started administering CPR to Mike. In just a few minutes, Philip McCandless, who is an EMT in the local rescue squad, arrived. Without hesitation, he knelt down over Mike's body and began the procedure to try to resuscitate him. I watched Philip labor diligently to restore breath to this precious young man. He continued the procedure as Mike was placed inside the rescue vehicle for transport to the hospital. But ... it was too late. There was no life there. Philip knew what to do and worked tirelessly to do it; but, even with his best effort, he could not breathe life back into Mike's body.

I will never forget that scene. I will never forget the impact that Philip's intense efforts made on me. You see, I have a lot of confidence in Philip. I have known him for most of his life. His father, Rev. James McCandless, pastored our church when he was a little boy. Philip is now a deacon at Holly Hill Church. He gives untold hours of his time to his church and his community. He is very sincere in everything he does. Through sweat and tears, he tried with all his might to restore life to this young body; but it was beyond his power to do so.

I have thought a lot about what happened that day. I see a profound spiritual lesson therein. Often we try so hard, by natural means, to bring life to programs and activities. We labor tirelessly and put great effort in trying to make them work. We initiate special events. We make a plea for more funding. We build nice facilities trying to attract people. We put our best energy into the work. Yet, we seem to get nowhere.

I am fully convinced that only God can breathe spiritual life into our efforts. In recent months I have truly prayed that God would help me not to make plans and then seek His blessings on my plans.

Instead I am seeking for God's plan; for when His plan is in place, it will have His blessing. I want to be more open and sensitive to the breath of God.

Just as the trees and grass need the warmth of the springtime sun to begin to come to life again, so do we. As Christians, we go through spiritual winters. Our Women's Ministries may sometimes seem dead and fruitless. We are God's instruments, and it takes human effort to carry on His work on earth. However, without God breathing on us the breath of life, we will never blossom to our full potential as Christian ministers. Let's turn our faces to God in prayer and receive the sunshine of God's anointing. It is only as He breathes on us and on our efforts that we will truly be renewed and able to produce the fullness of His beauty in this world.


INTERCESSION - MOVE AS HE MOVES...

JOHN AND EDNA PARKER "MR. & MRS. MISSIONARY OF THE N.C. CONFERENCE"

John and Edna Parker have been given the title "Mr. & Mrs. Missionary of the North Carolina Conference." Brother Parker has officially retired as of December 31, 1997. (Mrs. Edna Parker had retired earlier.) However, he will continue to make several teaching trips overseas a year. In addition he has been designated as the Hispanic Co-ordinator of the N.C. Conference. In this position, he will assist Director Thompson in the development of Hispanic Ministries within the Conference.

John B. Parker was born in Rocky Mount, North Carolina, on June 5, 1927, and lived there until he finished high school. He attended Holmes College of the Bible from 1944-1947, graduating with a Th.B. He was licensed as a minister in 1945 and pastored the P.H. Church in Bethel, North Carolina, from 1947-1951. While pastoring, John attended East Carolina University where he earned a B.S. degree in English and Social Studies and an M.A. degree in American History and Political Science.

John's mother had quickened his interest in mission from an early age. The call became more definite during his first year at Holmes. John married Edna Harrell who shared a call to China. Since China was closed to missionaries because of communist revolution, they volunteered to go any place they were needed. On Christmas Day, 1951, they left for San Jose, Costa Rica, to begin a missionary career that has now spanned five decades and extended to scores of countries.

While attending language school, John was also working closely with missionary Amos Bradley to pioneer the P.H. Church in Costa Rica. During his 23 years there, he was involved in church planting, conference administration, and ministerial training.

From 1974 to 1978, John served as instructor and Dean of the School of Religion at Southwestern College of Christian Ministries.

In 1978, John was appointed as General Supervisor of the Pentecostal Holiness work in Asia. He and Edna moved to Hong King, right to the doorstep of China. God had been faithful to take them to the land of their original calling. During their eight year stay in Hong Kong, they were involved in outreach ministry into China.

In 1986, John accepted a new assignment as Vice President and instructor at the Pentecostal Bible Institute in Santiago, Chile.

Then, in 1988, John was appointed as the General Supervisor of the P.H. work in Europe and the Middle East. John served in this capacity until 1993.

Since that time, John has been serving on special assignment as a mission field instructor. You might find him teaching at CICM in London one month and at the Costa Rican Bible Institute the next month. To stay abreast of the latest missions trends and strategies, he has been involved in proficiency studies at Wheaton College in Wheaton, Illinois, Fuller Seminary in Pasadena, California, and Columbia College and Seminary in Columbia, South Carolina.

John and Edna have one son, David, and two grandchildren, Ryan and Jennifer. David serves as Vice President of the Extension Loan Fund for the Pentecostal Holiness Church and is married to the former Irvina Smith.

John and Edna have set up housekeeping on four different continents since their marriage in 1949. John is truly gifted as a missionary-teacher.





LINES FROM LINDA

Mirror, mirror on the wall; Who's the fairest of them all?

Most of us probably remember those lines from our childhood story times. The mirror supposedly had supernatural powers to determine and speak as to who was the most beautiful woman in the land. I recall that the person looking in that mirror was desirous of being the fairest of the women in the land. When the mirror responded to her that there was another more beautiful than she, the desire to destroy that one consumed her. It never occurred to her to try to improve her own image – just to destroy the one who was more beautiful.

As Christians, we have a supernatural mirror that determines our spiritual beauty and speaks beck to us. That mirror is the Word of God. As we look into its pages, we see reflected the perfect image of Jesus Christ. As we read His Word and stand in His presence, the reflection that comes back to us is compared to His beauty.

When I look into the mirrors that surround me in this life, I can see the changes that time has made in me. In the natural, age has made visible changes in my reflection. I used to see dark hair, where now it is silver. I used to see a trim figure, where now I see a short, plump one. I used to see smooth skin, where now the wrinkles are forming. My mirror doesn't lie. It reflects exactly what is in front of it.

There are some mirrors that would deceive us. Years ago, I went with our children into a house of mirrors. There were mirrors everywhere. Some made you appear broad. Some caused curvy distortions to appear. Some made short, fat people look tall and thin. I really liked that one. I stood in front of it for quite a while. I remember thinking as I stood there how nice it was to see a reflection that made me look better than I actually was. In the natural, that was a fun little adventure. But when I think of that experience in light of the spiritual, I see great danger. As Christians, we can choose to measure ourselves by the world's reflections. When we do, we actually look pretty good. The flaws in our relationship with God are covered up. The malice in our heart doesn't show. The apathy and unconcern for the things of the Lord do not stand out, for we are looking into a mirror that doesn't reflect that. How cautious we must be that we do not get accustomed to looking into the wrong mirror

Just as we stand in front of the mirror each morning to brush our hair and prepare ourselves to be presentable to the world, we must also stand in front of the mirror of God's Word to prepare ourselves to be presentable unto the Lord. This mirror does not lie... it reflects absolute truth. As we view ourselves in its light, we are able to be changed into something truly beautiful.

II Corinthians 3:18 reads, "But we all, with unveiled face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit of the Lord." 3:18 (NKJV)

God's Word offers us the opportunity of transformation We can be transformed from the likeness of the world to the likeness of Christ. Just as the wicked witch wanted a positive answer from her mirror, I want a positive answer from God's mirror. I may never be "the fairest of them all," but my goal is to strive to be as close as I possibly can, a reflection of His Word to this world.

DOLLARS AND SENSE...

It was the mid '70s. My husband was accepting a new pastorate which was available because the current pastor had suffered a heart attack and was retiring. His sickness was just one of many such situations of which I was aware where ministers were sick and in some cases had died. I had never felt so insecure before. What would I do, as a mother of two small boys, if something happened to my husband? We would have no place to live and no salary. Prompted by this anxiety about the future, I decided I had to prepare myself to earn a living apart from my husband's ministry income.

This weighed heavily on my mind for months before I decided to pursue a career in cosmetology. I enrolled in Mitchell's School of Cosmetology. I already had a natural affinity for hairstyling. I knew this was something I could do well. Admittedly, the decision was basically an economic one; however, in the last twenty years of working in hair salons, I have found myself in the surprising and unexpected role of ministry.

Relationships develop between a hairdresser and a customer. As a Christian, I have the opportunity to interject Christ as the solution for the problems of my customers. I can share my faith in Jesus Christ with people who respect me and will listen to my testimony and are, in many cases, willing to believe in Christ for their own needs as a result of our friendship.

As a result of my unique position, I have become in a real sense a minister in my own right. What I started as a job has become, in some cases, a counseling session; in others, a prayer meeting. I have become the close confidant to more than one dying friend. I have laughed and wept with these special people. I have helped plan their memorial services. I have assisted in preparing them for burial by dressing their hair one last time. Most importantly, I have led some to Christ before they died.

I have always made sure my customers leave my shop looking

great; but more important, it has become my goal that they leave feeling better and knowing they have a friend who cares and prays for them.

I have had the joy of sharing baby's first haircut and then watching those children grow to become high school graduates.

Over these years, my job has been a joy. Whether I was providing a hairpiece for a cancer patient in chemo treatment or crying with a wife and mother whose husband just left or comforting a friend whose loved one had died, my job has been a joy, because Christ is using it for His glory.

There is such a broad avenue in the workplace to do ministry. I suspect anyone working outside the home can easily make the transition from the mundane to ministry, from job to joy, from the commonplace to comfort. Christ is looking for both women and men who will supply the raw material, the workplace, for Him to create a viable, meaningful ministry.

Ours is a hurting, disappointing world filled with lonely people in real pain. You can offer at least some of those people a better life. You may be the only chance they have to prepare for eternity.

From the Superintendent

Rev. W. Eddie Morris, a gifted leader and "people person," served as superintendent of this conference from 1941 to 1975. One of my

favorite memories of Brother Morris is in regard to his great sense of humor. Out of that quality arose many wise words of counsel. The following copy from Superintendent Morris' Monthly Message was lifted from the May, 1959 Evangel. This article conveys a powerful message that is as appropriate today as it was thirty-nine years age. I pray it will speak to each reader as it does to me.

"How The String Can Be Broken"

A few days ago, I was on my way to the Post Office and my wife had a yard machine she wanted me to return to the store. In the process of getting this contraption to stay in the trunk of the car, I saw I needed a string. Looking around I saw "the lady of the house" had placed a string-lattice around a portion of the yard where dirt had been hauled to keep the paper boy and his bicycle out, along with a few children.

I needed a string! I didn't have time to go back into the house, so looking around to be sure she wasn't seeing me, I took the string fence apart for a short distance in order to get the fastener I needed. But when I started to cut this string, I had no knife. What could I do? Going in the house was out of the question now!

After an examination, I decided I could break the string by separating the individual threads. This I did successfully, and insofar as I know, my wife hasn't found out about this yet. But in separating this string thread by thread, I thought of how the enemy works to divide the church and break it apart.

The devil knows he cannot tear or break all of us bound together. He knows there is unity in the "Bond of Peace." What does he do? He starts taking us apart in opinion, by severing unity, by destroying peace among us. One by one he breaks the threads. This is where he can get his fingers to divide.

How many times have we given him an opening? We don't like a thing that has been or is being done in the church. What can we do to stop it? Suppose it is the Sunday school teacher of the Sunday school Superintendent or even the pastor? Suppose it is the church choir, the youth service, or maybe the building committee is doing something we don't like. We wanted the church plan to have more or less space.

What can be done to stop it? Can it be stopped? Yes, it can be stopped at least for a while. Paul seemed to realize this in that he said, "For a great door and effectual is opened to me, and there are many adversaries" [I Corinthians 16:9].

Our love for the church as a whole must surpass our local prejudices. Oppose anything in reason until the majority has spoken; then work to make the adopted project a success. Building programs at times have been held up because one person would not work with the pastor. This person waits until conference hoping the pastor will be moved so they will not be bothered by his efforts at progress. The only apparent way for some people to get what they want is to take the whole apart piece by piece.

Now I haven't told my wife about my getting the string and how I got it. I think she will forgive me, for in actuality it amounted to be very little, but to take conference and church projects apart piece by piece or refuse to work with them just because they aren't to our liking, we will give an account to God.

Let us not allow the devil to sabotage our church programs by using us to break unity, peace and good will among the membership by talking everything down that didn't originate with us. Let us be workers together with God. In this way the twisted twine will hold, and we will not be destroyed by demons or men.

flowers to decorate their homes and churches. They sang spring carols and received gifts in return. They chose a King and Queen of May. Villagers danced around a Maypole, holding the ends of ribbons that streamed from its top. They wove the beautiful ribbons back and forth around the

Maypole until it was covered with bright colors.

May Day! Mother's Day! Both are celebrations that come to remind us of the handiwork of God . . . the beauty of spring flowers and the beauty of a Godly mother. Let's take this opportunity to celebrate them both!

MAMA'S COCONUT CAKE . . .

This recipe comes from Damon Fowler's Classic Southern Cooking: A Celebration of the Cuisine of the Old South Cookbook. It will make a great Mother's Day dessert.

1 cup unsalted butter, softened 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 2 cups sugar

2 2/3 cups all-purpose flour

1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup milk

7 egg whites

1 medium coconut

2 to 3 tablespoons sugar Seven-minute frosting

Beat butter at medium speed with electric mixer until creamy; gradually add sugar, beating well.

Combine flour, baking powder and salt; add to butter mixture alternately with milk, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Beat at low speed after each addition. Stir in vanilla.

Beat egg whites until soft peaks form; fold into batter. Pour batter into 3 greased and floured 9-inch round cake pans.

Bake at 375 for 25 to 30 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pans on wire racks 10 minutes. Remove from pans, and cool completely on wire racks.

Pierce "eyes" at end of coconut with an ice pick. Pour liquid through a fine wire-mesh strainer into a 1-cup liquid measuring cup; add enough water to measure 1 cup, if necessary. Set liquid aside.

Crack coconut and shred. (To get the meat of coconut, use hammer to crack shell and break coconut open. Then pry meat away from shell with knife or clean screwdriver. Use vegetable peeler to remove brown skin from meat. Shred with grater or food processor.)

Cook coconut liquid and 2 to 3 tablespoons sugar in a small saucepan over medium-low heat, stirring constantly until sugar is dissolved. Remove coconut syrup from heat.

Place 1 cake layer on cake plate; drizzle with 1/4 cup coconut syrup. Spread 1 cup Seven-minute frosting over cake and sprinkle with 1/4 of shredded coconut. Repeat procedure with second layer using 5 tablespoons coconut syrup. Top with third layer, drizzle with 1/4 cup coconut syrup. Spread top and sides of cake with remaining frosting and press remaining coconut onto top and side of cake. Drizzle remaining syrup over top of cake.

Cover and Chill at least 24 hours. (Essential that cake chill 24 hours before serving)

SEVEN-MINUTE FROSTING: Mix 4 egg whites, 2 cups sugar and 1/2 cup water in top of a large double boiler. Beat at low speed until blended. Place over boiling water, beating at high speed for 7 minutes or until soft peaks form. Remove from heat. Beat to spreading consistency. Spread IMMEDIATELY over cooled cake. (Yield: 4 1/2 cups)

1997 BLESSINGS

The Conference ended the year with 23,539 members. This was a net increase of 405 members –a 2% increase. The Sunday a.m. attendance increased by 662 per Sunday to an average of 16,543 (a 4% increase). Seven new churches started. These new churches accounted for over 300 of the new members. The Conference ended the year with 176 churches and 184 preaching points. Nineteen of these preaching points are Hispanic churches.

We actually had a better year in the Conference statistically than the records show. Several churches cleaned their rolls in December 1997. Roll cleaning must be done, but it surely can hurt when a church waits for several years to do it. Last year in July the Conference was ahead by over 600 new members.

We must continually pray and work for renewal and revival. We still have a major job to do. Less than 40% of the people in our Conference go to church once a week. Over 31% of the adults work every Sunday. We must reach these people with an alternate worship service.

The Evangelism Ministries personnel are working faithfully and diligently to reach the

people within the Conference with the Gospel Message. The message has not changed. People can still be saved, sanctified, filled with the Spirit, and divinely healed. Deliverance is possible. Hope can be renewed. Lives can be changed!

The goals for 1998 include: 5 new organized churches, 7 new church starts, at least one new Hispanic church per district, and 2,000 new members (Target 2,000 goal).

The Conference has its first ethnic co-ordinator, Rev. John Parker (Hispanic Co-ordinator). The Conference has a functioning Hispanic Planning and Credentials Committee.

God is at work in the N.C. Conference.

NEW CHURCH PLANTER

Rev. Chap Chappell, former music director at Grace Family Fellowship, Robersonville, has become a member of an Evangelism USA church planting team in Virginia Beach, Virginia. The leader of the team is Rev. Archie Callahan.

The Norfolk-Virginia Beach area has a population of 1.5 million. Ranking 15th in fiscal strength among America's 50 wealthiest cities, the challenges of a church invasion are great.

Churches and individuals may support Chap and Christy in this new project. May God bless their efforts. Churches who support them would earn the 6th star in Missions 7-Star Program. Their account number in Oklahoma City is 09201. Funds can be funneled through the Conference Office.

The ideal is for a church to have a team present (perhaps building committee). Participants must register. A fee of \$20 (with notebook) and \$10 (without notebook) will be charged. Lunch will be served.

SIMONIZING YOUR SUNDAY SCHOOL

It's the time of the year when young men's hearts turn to their pet fancies. Their fancy may be a fishing trip after a forbidding winter season; or working in the yard (especially when the lady of the house so requests). A young man's heart could turn to gardening, with the fresh smell of a newly plowed ground. I am told that some men's hearts even turn to love. That is especially true on a warm spring day when there's plenty of daylight to spend with many a young man's first love: his car! Oh the pains we take to make an old car look new. We wash and polish and scrub and shine and wax and use those special "secrets of a clean car" that we dare tell no one. There's nothing quite like the slick finishes the can of "Simonize Wax" yields. We are even convinced that our car's engines run better if the water beads on the hood when it rains. I've noticed one thing about car waxes: the older the paint job, the more necessary the polish. So on these warm spring days, it is necessary to get out the automobile wax and "simonize" your car.

There is an application to the Sunday school, which would benefit us all. Consider that the Sunday school is perhaps the oldest outreach ministry of the modern church. To give some perspective to its age, think about this: the Sunday school began in England before all thirteen original colonies had ratified the Constitution of the United States of America. Also, Sunday school predates the presidency of Georgia Washington. Its rich history of fellowship, instruction, and most importantly, soul winning have made it one of the best outreaches for ministry the Lord has ever placed at our disposal. But, neither its "seniority" as an outreach ministry not its familiar traditions which most of us have come to love and appreciate are ample reasons to continue it as a viable ministry of the 21st Century Church. However, if we keep the Sunday school "simonized," it will always be a revenant ministry to all ages. Let me explain.

Jesus knew that accomplishing the Great Commission would not be an easy task. He also knew that for His Church to be built, it would require the efforts of everyday people, in our vernacular, "the common man." There are two such people whose roles become a pattern for us all. One is named Simon Peter; the other is his brother, Andrew. The Lord called both, but the interesting thing to me is how they came to be called. Your Sunday schools can take a lesson by the simplicity of the call of these two disciples.

If you study his life, you find that Andrew was always

bringing something to Jesus. He brought the lad with the fishes and loaves when Christ fed the 5000. What a day for the little boy! This New Testament Sunday School Superintendent caused a child to have a memory of a lifetime because he knew that Jesus could take five loaves and two fishes and do wonders with them. When was the last time you brought somebody to Jesus through the Sunday school? But this little boy wasn't the only person Andrew brought to Jesus. Andrew was thrilled at being a disciple. So thrilled in fact that he had to share this good news with someone. So the Scriptures say that he first findeth his own brother Peter and brought him to the Master. That Peter made an impact on the Church cannot be denied. He wrote two epistles and was prominent in the founding of the Church. Though people talk about the greatness of Peter, they seldom talk about the greatness of his brother. But it was Andrew, a man who knew that Jesus could use anything he'd bring him, who brought his brother to the Savior.

One of my fond childhood memories is an old Sunday school campaign that used these two biblical brothers as a springboard. If you brought a friend to Sunday School, the Superintendent would give you a name badge that said, "I am an Andrew." If you were such a guest, your name badge would read, "I am a Simon Peter." I remember the pride with which I wore my little badge that identified me as an Andrew. I even remember the Sunday morning that my parents took a picture of my two unchurched friends who had their Simon Peter badges on. At the end of the campaign, all the "Andrews" and "Simon Peters" were guests of the Sunday school at a Friday night fish fry held in gratitude for their participation.

That was probably forty years ago, yet just a few weeks ago it dawned upon me that we were served the same meal Andrew and his friend at that day when Jesus fed the 5000. As a little boy, I never thought much about it. I never thought much about the impact such a small Sunday school campaign could have on my friends, until one of them joined the Pentecostal Holiness Church and married one of her daughters. To this day, my childhood friend, who was my "Simon Peter," is still a member of the Pentecostal Holiness Church. He was my first effort at "Simonizing the Sunday School."

In the simple campaign we used, Simon Peter was the visitor. And we want our Sunday schools to be full of them. We'll keep a church full of them if we allow God to give to us the spirit of Andrew. We need more of a heart to keep bringing people to Jesus. As long as we have Andrews, we'll keep our Sunday schools "simonized."

OCCUPY

Please read St. Luke 19:11..."Occupy till I come."

To occupy means to not sit idly by but to invest; stay busy in the Master's service.

This account exhorts us to be ready for the coming of the Lord. We must not waste talent, time, opportunity, or energy. There will be an accounting of our entire lives to the Lord.

The world has too many holds on our people and appeals to us in too many ways. It has too many tentacles to entangle us and presents so many problems with which we must contend. So many seemingly legitimate things clamor for our time and attention. When we remind ourselves of the urgency of our readiness for His coming, we are able to discard these distractions more efficiently.

So many people seem satisfied with the status quo, but this is not so with those who are looking for Jesus. Their lives conform to the heavenly standard and their hearts are set on things above. They fear neither the favor, fury, nor faces of men. Their gaze is fixed on treasures above. Eternity in His presence is their goal and aspiration.

The command "Occupy till I come" is powerful in that it enhances all our Christian service and activity. It is a trumpet call to battle and ultimate victory. Dr. Hyman Appleman, Russian Jew, tells how his father worked away from home, sometimes many months at a time without coming home. Then a letter would come stating that he would be home at such and such a time. Oh, the careful activity in preparation for his coming. King Jesus is coming! Our preparation must be with utmost care.

The command "Occupy till I come" brings us encouragement in the day of trial, distress, trouble, and disappointment. It invigorates and helps us to overcome in the hour of temptation. It gives us grace to withstand in a generation of callous indifference and cold-hearted sin.

If we are to obey Christ's command "Occupy till I come,"

we must invade the enemy's territory and declare ceaseless war against him. We are inspired to possess His promises for now and in Heaven.

From the Superintendent

I understand it is on record that a Scottish landowner, who was unexpectedly detained while visiting away from home, sent a postcard to his bailiff or agent on which he wrote some brief but clear instructions:

"Do not try to get rid of the thistles. Be sure to deepen the ditches: they so easily get silted up. Mend the fences lest the lambs get straying. It is time to plow up the big meadows. You may expect my return very soon."

The Scottish master was evidently a man of few words. He might have used even fewer and have said simply, "Occupy till I come." This is just what our Lord and Master said to us, His stewards or agents.

The landowner's postcard could well be an exposition on Christ's instructions to us. Let us check up and see if we are following His instructions properly!

"Do not try to get rid of the thistles." There is no need to cultivate weeds. They grow and spread fast and take nourishment for themselves and gradually crowd out the flower and fruit of the Spirit in us! Christ died on Calvary to free us from ourselves! Selfishness on the job, in the home, and even in the church needs treatment! Bitterness of spirit and uncontrolled anger and backbiting must go. Ephesians 4:31-32 states, "Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamor, and evil speaking, be put away from you with all malice: and be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."

"Be sure to deepen the ditches." Rain and wind will silt the ditches. We must keep them clean. Just like clogged arteries keep blood from flowing with life-giving ingredients for our bodies, our spiritual channels must stay clean. It is a bit like the necessity of keeping the drain pipes open and clear in our homes. Someone has aptly said, "We cannot be channels of blessing if our lives are not free from all sin; we will be barriers and a hindrance to those we are trying to win."

"Mend the fences lest the lambs get straying." We must build a fence around our children with the family altar. The hedge of prayer and Bible reading will protect them in the time of storm. We need to build a good fence around our observance of the Lord's day! It must center around heartchanging, life-giving worship. Let us guide the secular

Harvest Temple Fire

It seems like a very long time ago when God gave Pastor Fred Jones of Gum Chapel Pentecostal Holiness Church a vision of a new church for the members to worship in. In 1978, Rev. Jones walked onto property on West 10th street in Roanoke Rapids, NC - land that belonged to someone else - and claimed it for Gum Chapel and the Lord. The church had no "building fund," no "savings account," and only a few members, but God was with them. With only a \$5 bill in his hand, Rev. Jones stood on the parcel of land and prayed, not only asking for God's will but promising God a church for conservative holiness worship. The months ahead would prove to be challenging as well as stressful for the small number that set out so vigorously to have a new place to worship. There were probably several times that they felt like giving up, but the promise of a new place to worship gave them the courage to press forward. Just one trip to Gum Chapel reminded them they they needed a place where they could grow. The old church building had served its purpose well, but now it was time to move forward. Parking space was limited. During every service, there were vehicles parked on the shoulder of U.S. Highway 158. This was very dangerous and a constant reminder that there was a great need for better, less dangerous parking.

The fund raising began. After many stews (selling plates nearly every week), collecting bottles and newspapers, etc., and yard sales as well as many other sales projects, the new building began to take shape. Rev. Jones not only supervised the work, but

he spent long hard hours doing everything he could to help with the building process. It took 18 months to complete the church and get it ready for services. The name of the church was changed from Gum Chapel P.H. Church to Harvest Temple P.H. Church. Services began October, 1979.

The church has grown in the 18 years since its completion. God has blessed the church abundantly, and we feel He will continue to do so as long as we keep our promise to keep it conservative.

Raymond Cecil Abernathy

Charter Member of Vick's Chapel July 16, 1934 — January 22, 1998

During a tent revival conducted by Rev. Jettie Parker and Rev. J. Albert Taylor on May 19, 1947, Cecil Abernathy was saved. During future tent services he experienced sanctification and the infilling of the Holy Ghost.

He and others that received definite experiences during the revival formed Vick's Chapel Pentecostal Holiness Church and became charter members.

Brother Abernathy answered the call into the ministry. He received his Mission Worker License on November 10, 1961. He and his wife, Ora Lee, together faithfully served the Lord in ministry for 46 years.

Brother Abernathy pastored three churches, one being his home church. Due to health reasons he resigned as pastor of Vick's Chapel in the fall of 1994. He was a deacon and Sunday School Superintendent until his death.

Brother Abernathy was faithful to his church. He expressed many times the need of keeping the doors of the church open at service time, thus showing a light for Jesus to the neighborhood. Brother Abernathy is survived by his wife, Ora; one daughter, Dorothy Mitchell; son-in-law, James Mitchell; grandchildren Jamie Narron and Joey Mitchell; two sisters and one half brother and sister.

Funeral services were conducted on Saturday, January 24, in Rocky Mount at the Johnson Funeral Home by Pastor Hubert Shropshire and Rev. Fred Bass. Burial was in the Rocky Mount Memorial Park.

Brother Abernathy was well-known and respected in his community as a minister of the gospel and a successful businessman. He will be missed. Our prayers are with Sister Abernathy and the family.



LINES FROM LINDA...

My friend, Emeler, has helped me with housekeeping for more than twenty years. Every Friday she shows up faithfully at 9 a.m. to see that the vacuuming and scrubbing and other weekly chores are handled. Often we will set aside a special day to do other particular chores. Such is the case this week. With the pretty warm weather and sunshine, I decided it is time to wash windows again. As any homemaker knows, that is not a most favorite job. However, I have a date with Emeler tomorrow to clean the windows. I must tell you that, even though Emeler is 70 years old, she prefers to climb the ladder and clean the outside as I clean the inside.

Emeler is a dear godly woman, and much of our time together is spent in conversation regarding spiritual matters. She is a student of the Bible and one of the best examples of what a true Christian should be that I have ever known. She finds spiritual meaning in the everyday experiences of life. As I was thinking of her this morning and remembering our date to wash windows tomorrow, I began to think about the spiritual lesson from the window-washing chore.

As I view the windows now, several months of dust and spots have accumulated on the outside. The insides of the windows are also dusty and have collected fingerprints and smudges. Even though the sun is shining brightly outside, there seems to be a bit of a haze as it reflects on the glass panes. How like me this scenario is! For if I neglect my spiritual life, I become spotty and smudged too. If my life is coated with the filthiness of the world, then the SON can't shine clearly through me either.

But tomorrow, the Lord willing, Emeler and I will take care of these windows. We'll get out the Windex and paper towels, and with a little "elbow grease" we'll wash and polish the windows until they sparkle. When we are finished, the golden beams of sunlight will shine clearly through, brightening the inside of the house.

That's the way I want to be! I want to be clean and pure before God so that the light of Jesus can shine brightly through my life. I want to reflect the full beauty of the Lord and not have it hindered or hazed in any way. In order to do so, I must allow God to cleanse me thoroughly from all unrighteousness.

There are a few of the windows in our house that we can't clean with Windex and paper towels. The seal around the two glass panels has been broken, thus allowing condensation to gather between them. This condensation has caused quite an ugly formation there. The only way to clean these is to take them apart, clean, and reseal them. Sometimes, I have to be taken apart too. I allow little bubbles of this-and-that to seep into my attitude and inner spirit. When this happens, I have to go to the master "fixer" and, like David, ask Him to create in me a clean heart and a right spirit. I have to ask the Lord

to seal me with a fresh anointing of His Holy Spirit.

There are lessons to be learned even in the mundane daily chores around the house. Thank you, Emeler, for teaching me to look for spiritual application in every area of my life.

Mrs. Jean Williams shares with us from her devotional at the Greenville meeting:

My Aunt Alice recently sent me an article entitled *Life Begins at 80*, in which the author proclaims all the nice things about being that age. Everyone may not feel the excitement of my Aunt Alice at being 80. Among some there is anxiety about growing older...as reflected in a question a New York reader sent to the famed author, Malcolm Boyd. He asked, "What decisions or actions can we take to make our aging process easier?" Malcolm Boyd replied, "Think positively. Plan carefully. Take good care of your mind. Take good care of your soul."

Charles Spurgeon, the British minister, in his commentary on Psalm 71 pictures two ships that have been in long voyages at sea. Three or four years out, they have gone through hot climates and cold and have run through many difficulties and great storms. Yet, they have been kept alive at sea. And as they speak when they meet at sear near the haven, how they congratulate each other!

Spurgeon advises, "Old disciples, like ships, should do so. Reflecting on their voyages should move them to bless God and congratulate each other when they meet...because God has kept grace alive in their souls."

Most of us remember Psalm 71 and David's prayer. In it we see David's desire to live his remaining years with one major purpose. That was to live to declare God's might to the next generation and God's power to all who are to come.

The April issue of *Vitality Magazine* reports longevity researchers say the average American life span has been expanded by nearly 30 years. Should we be beneficiaries of those expanded years, what will be our desire? Will it be to just be happy with the accolades people extend because of our many years? Will we be content to congratulate each other that we weathered the storms and have been kept by God's grace? OR CAN WE PRAY DAVID'S PRAYER and embrace his purpose to live the expanded years to declare God's truth to the next generations?

I will tell you this purpose presents a significant challenge. The belief system of the contemporary youth culture is not the traditional Christian system. Our youth have been taught in schools, universities, and by the media that there is no such thing as absolute truth and that the Bible was written by men long ago and filled with errors and therefore not pertinent to their generation. This generation has been left searching for something – answers and a place to belong. When they find that place they align themselves with the belief system of that community or tribal group. Though they tend to reject Biblical truths, we know there is a God-shaped hole in the soul, and only God can fill it.

It has been observed that those modeling integrity, humility, servanthood, and the fruit of the Spirit can and do make an impact on the contemporary youth culture. Recently a newscaster said, "This is an image culture, a culture searching for an image-modeling life to emulate. What is seen, more than what is said, will touch this generation."

So I conclude with this appeal: Let our desire be to live a loving Fruit-of-the-Spirit life and be truly concerned about our attitudes and the way we live before this searching, homeless generation.



GET ACQUAINTED WITH OUR HISPANIC MINISTERS

For the next few months the *Evangel* wil be introducing several of the conference's Hispanic ministers. The first listed (firts to get in his testimony) is one fine man of God. He is Pastor Francisco Concepcion of the Igblesia Genesis Hispana Santidad Pencostal Church in Wake County. The church shares the use of the Genesis P.H. Church building. Pastor Concepcion serves on the Conference Hispanic Credentials and Planning Committee. He is a leader!

PASTOR FRANCISCO CONCEPCION

"Come out of you land, you and your family, and I will bless you!"

In the decade of the 1980's the hand of God was upon me. I received the calling of God. At the time I was involved in secular business. My business was prospering according to the order of man. I obeyed the voice of God and left for the island of Puerto Rico. In this country God poured out His grace and I ministered with the Assemblies of God in the position of teacher. Yet the most significant thing was the God took us to the streeets, slums, and hospitals saving hundreds of souls. My story would be incomplete if I would fail to tell you that of all that God gave me (and most important God gave me in this country) was my

companion in ministry. My wife, Awilda Concepcion, she is my other half and part. I give thousands of thanks to God for her.

After eight years of living there the call of God came to leave Puerto Rico. Leaving all behind, we journeyed to the U.S.A. One of the other things God saw fit to give us was our American citizenship. This was like the Apostle Paul in the city of Rome so that we could better travel with freedom to other places. In obedience my wife and I left Puerto Rico with our

children to the city of Providence, Rhode Island, at the end of 1988. In this place the Shekinah of God was demonstrated. We preached the gospel in season and out of season, in the streets, slums, hospitals, and many received eternal life. From there we were able to go to the countries of Guatemala, Mexico, Haiti, Venezuela, and Santo Domingo. I went there fulfilling the role of an evangelist. We brought help to the poor, orphaned, and the helpless. But more than anything God saved thousands of lives (souls) needing salvation.

Then again I heard the voice of God after being in this state for six years. My family was much larger now and I had a secular job that was very good. Yet, God spoke and said, "You must leave. For you have a work to do in the south of the United States." This word was confirmed by men and women of God and by God's prophets. The life of a Christian is a constant challenge. It is better to obey God than man. I presented my resignation in the month of September, 1995. My witness was Rololfo Olivio. The administrator thought I had gone crazy, for my salary with the raise was very significant. Yet I obeyed God and resigned. On Ocotber 17, 1995, I decided to depart, leaving everything behind on my job. That same day God gathered eight ministers, pastors, and evangelists and with many tears we all hugged and a bottle of oil was poured over my car since I didn't even know where I was to go. All I knew was that I was going to the south. Three days later we were on Highway 95. We arrived in North Carolina very tired since our car had been our home and McDonald's the place where we washed our faces. We arrived at the city of Raleigh, a place that was unknown to me, yet known to God. The Holy Spirit confirmed to us that He wanted us here. This was where we got to know the International Pentecostal Holiness Church through our brother, Tony Ortiz. Since I had been an ordained minister in Rhode Island, I was received as an ordained minister in August, 1996, by the North Carolina Conference. There I met people that are very special to God who have been of much edification to and my family, such as the members of the board; my esteemed brother, Rev. T. Elwood Long, Superintendent; and my esteemed brother,

Chris Thompson, Assistant Superintendent and Director of World Evanglism. I also met another man of God, my pastor, Vernon Potter. Through this brother the doors were opened to the calling of God. I have been to Israel twice, once on tour and once for an extended missionary trip that lasted for five weeks. I went in the name of the Lord, alone, but God's presence was with me in a mighty way. I lived among the Muslims in what today is Al Lazaria, West Bank, but in the time of Christ it was known as Bethany, the home of Mary and Martha. (That is just two miles from Jerusalem.) During that time I was able to minister to Palestinian and Hebrew believers and non-believers alike. It was one of the most powerful experiences of my life as a Christian. Since that time I have also been to Jamaica twice, once for a VBS with Rev. Ann Baines for a week, and then later for a month to help an independent church with its ministry in St. Anne's Bay. That experience also taught me valuable lessons about ministry and being around others who are different and at times strange. (All of these trips took place in 1997; God has done a quick work.)

Currently I am working on my Minister's License with the North Carolina Conference of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church and have been approved by the World Missions board to work at our Coffee House in Jerusalem. I am planning to be there from August through December of this year. On June 27, 1998, I am to be married. My fianceé's name is Jennifer Roscoe. She is a fine young Christian woman who loves God with all her heart. She is to accompany me to Jerusalem in August. She is an equal part of this ministry. In fact, her talents far outweight mine.

Our desire for the future, subject to change if God calls otherwise, is to plant churches in Israel. Our priority is Jerusalem, but other places like Tel Aviv, Haifa, Tiberias, and Beersheva need the same. Jennifer holds the same love for Israel and the Jews as I do, herself being of Jewish descent through her maternal grandmother. I do not know why God has chosen me for such blessings and responsibilities, but through Christ I am able and because of Christ I am grateful. For it is he "who works anyway. To God be the glory and praise forever. PRAY FOR THE PEACE OF JERUSALEM."



From the Superintendent

The following article was written by missionary-statesman, Rev. John B. Parker, of Dunn, N.C. Brother Parker and missionary wife, Edna, have ministered in the International Pentecostal

Holiness Church since the 1940s. Mr. Parker currently serves as Hispanic Coordinator for this Conference.

It is imperative that the church stand up for the freedoms fought for and won by our foreparents in the faith. I trust the reprint of this article will spur each reader to Biblically spiritual action in defense of our freedom. "The Church in the American Revolution" was first printed in the June 17, 1976, Advocate of the Pentecostal Holiness Church.

THE CHURCH IN THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

By Rev. John Parker

The revolt of the American colonies against England in 1776 was not the mindless reaction of a society gone mad, but the breaking of a mighty wave that had been building for 150 years. While the King and Parliament systematically tightened the grip of empire on the far-flung dominions of the Crown, the American colonists embarked on a crusade of individual freedom and self-government. Diverging courses were bound to break apart. Though the struggle was political and economic, there were religious factors that had tempered the American mind toward a new destiny; a destiny which became a transcendent object of reverence and a sacred trust to keep.

On the eve of the Revolution, three religious factors had helped create an atmosphere favorable to rebellion. The Great Awakening (1730-1750) had blurred the denominational lines among the dissenter groups, lessening their sectarian tensions. It had also drawn many adherents away from the Anglican church, weakening the chains which bound the colonists to England.

In the Quebec Act of 1774, Parliament granted toleration to French Catholics and extended Quebec territory southward into the land wedge between the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers. This caused extreme agitation among the colonists, for it brought Popish influences incomfortably close to Protestant New England and the Middle Colonies. Furthermore,

dissenter groups vehemently objected to the Anglican threat to establish an episcopate in America, for this would bring increased interference from Parliament.

Leading the vanguard for independence were the Congregational Churches, described as "firebrands for liberty." One Loyalist labeled them as "wicked," "malicious," and "inflammatory," their pulpits converted into "gutters of sedition," having substituted politics for the gospel. And New England clergymen did more than preach in favor of revolution. John Cleaveland of Ipswich, Massachusetts, persuaded his entire parish to enlist, and then enlisted himself. David Avery of Windsor, Vermont, called his congregation to arms, bade them farewell, and marched away at the head of a score of volunteers, enlisting others along the way.

There was no doubt as to where the Presbyterians stood. Though the Synod of New York and Pennsylvania had disavowed any "intention of inflaming the minds of the people, or urging them to acts of violence and disorder," they heartily endorsed the Continental Congress as the elected representatives of the people. John Hughes, stamp distributor for Pennsylvania, reported in 1775 that "bigoted Presbyterians were ripe for the rebellion when they poisoned the minds of the people enough." The Hanover Presbytery in Virginia was the first religious group to officially accept the Declaration of Independence, a document whose signers included only one minister, a Presbyterian.

The Lutherans were not too well organized in the Colonies, but one family, the Muhlenbergs, gave outstanding leadership in the cause for freedom. A son, John Peter Muhlenberg, rose in his pulpit the Sunday after Bunker Hill and told his congregation that "in the language of Holy Writ, there is a time to preach and a time to fight; and now is the time to fight." He then removed his pulpit vestments and stood before his people in the full uniform of a Virginia colonel.

Baptists everywhere and in great numbers supported the rebellion. Persecuted under the English laws, they favored a cause which promised to give them liberty of conscience. Many of their meeting houses were burned and their ministers imprisoned by the British during the war.

In 1776, Methodism numbered only 19 preachers and 3,148 members. They were generally regarded as unpatriotic, due to pronouncements made by John Wesley. He at first disapproved of British repressive measures but changed his

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mind after reading Dr. Samuel Johnson's "Taxation no Tyranny." Wesley then wrote "A Calm Address to the American Colonies," condemning their actions against the crown, urging them to lay down their arms. By 1778, every Methodist minister sent out by Wesley had left America except Francis Asbury, who was in forced retirement. Though some Methodists went over to the patriot side, their contributions were not sufficient to remove from Methodism the unpatriotic stigma that fell upon it.

Most of the Anglican clergy were loyal to the King, many of them fleeing to Canada and England. Those who remained obeyed the dictates of necessity and were known for their peaceful submission and quiet deportment. Public opinion made loyalist sermons extremely dangerous. But one who braved the danger was Jonathan Boucher who was bodily removed from his pulpit by a group of malcontents. He later returned and preached for six months with two loaded pistols on the cushon in front of the pulpit, offering to meet violence with violence.

A majority of the Anglican laymen supported the Revolution, and their pulpits supplied the third highest number of chaplains to the patriot cause. Two-thirds of signers of the Declaration of Independence were of the Anglican faith, as were some of the most prominent leaders: George Washington, James Madison, Patrick henry, John Marshall, and Alexander Hamilton.

Though churches cannot be held responsible for precipitating the American Revolution, they did contribute a "religious temper" which bred discontent with the old order. The politics of the churches favored democracy and republicanism, for where religious liberty is found in part, a demand for political freedom will come in like manner. The Christian churches supported the cause for independence because of their profound conviction that every man has the right to live and worship his God according to the dictates of his own conscience.

The members and former pastors were given a booklet on the church's history.



Most important of all, Mammy believed in God.
She observed Sunday as a holy day.
Her children were taught many dos and don'ts
in a firm and disciplined way.
Yes, there was something special 'bout Mammy. She was
strong-willed and determined, you bet;
But she left us so much richer; and Mammy we'll never forget.

You see, Mammy lived when there were no modern conveniences; yet, she had time to be a friend. She didn't have much money, but she put to use what she had. Even when she was up in her late eighties, she was still able to cook and do things for us and willingly did so. During the nearly one hundred years of Mammy's life, she saw many amazing discoveries and inventions.

At the 1998 NCWM Convention, the following tribute was made to Sue Parker as she retired from the NCWM Board.

There is a lady in our midst today who deserves special recognition. Actually, she deserves recognition in many areas ... as a devoted wife and the mother of five children, grandmother of ten grandchildren and one great-grandchild ... as a retired minister and a retired missionary. But, today we want to pay special tribute to this lady for forty-five years of service to Women's Ministries. This lady is none other than our own SUE PARKER.

As a child, Sue admired the work of the women of her church, and that they allowed her to participate in their activities and encouraged her in the Lord. As she was preparing to go away to school at Holmes, they gave her a shower; and, while she was in school, they remembered her with "goody" boxes. After graduation from Holmes, while preparing to go the mission field, Sue had close association with the Oak Street Woman's Auxiliary (now The First Church). They were a wonderful role model as to what WA was all about. They helped fill trunks with housekeeping items needed on the mission field. While there, she was privileged to attend the 1953 NCWA Convention. Little did she know then how her whole life would be so intertwined in the work of Woman's Auxiliary, as it was called then.

When Sue arrived in Africa, she became directly involved in WA work and was elected to the Tansvaal/Orange Free State WA Board. During the newly twenty years she was there, she served as Conference Secretary-Treasurer, Vice President, and then President.

In 1974, Sue and Jettie returned from South Africa and were back in North Carolina. He became pastor of the Sanford First Church, and Sue was elected Vice President of the NCWA at the 1974 convention. At the 1976 NCWA Convention, Sue was elected President, as long-time President Dollie Davenport gave her resignation. At the 1978 Convention, Sue was elected for another two-year term. In 1980, Sue announced to the NCWM Convention that she and her husband would be returning to Africa. Upon arriving in Malawi, she assumed leadership of the Conference WA there.

In 1989, Sue returned to the North Carolina Women's Ministries, filling a board member position which had been vacated during the quadrennium. In 1990, she was re-elected for a four-year term as a board member. In 1994, Sue was again elected to the NCWM Board, this time as Vice President. She then teamed up with Linda Thomas, Patsy Deese, Phyllis Harrell, and Janice Marshburn. This has been a special team, to say the least.

Sue has given herself fully to the work of the Lord, and Women's Ministries has been a big part of that assignment. During the past four years, Sue's portfolio has been missions. In reference to WM Christmas missions, Sue says she has been on both the receiving end as a missionary and on the giving end as a worker on the home front. She has given her best for the Master. She has much expertise and many years of service, but now Sue will be leaving the NCWM Board. I am sure that she will continue to be active and will be readily available to bless your church or WM as an excellent speaker. She is a wellspring of knowledge regarding WM work and the work of the IPHC in general. She is a genuine woman of God who has made a great contribution to the WM on the local, conference, national, and international levels.

In order to effectively process new students, provide classrooms, and meet needs for growth, we need to relocate to adequate facilities this summer. Pray that CICM will continue to have a ministry of excellence through this transitional period.

In addition to these special projects, other projects are supported through the Global Outreach Offering. They are national workers, deficit missionary accounts, "new" missionary quick start program, stateside promotion, annual missionary retreats, and others.

TITHING

Is it a Good Idea or a God-Given Plan?

Please read these scriptures before you read this article. Malachi 3:8-12; I Corinthians 16:1,2

I read this quote somewhere and wrote it in my notes: "Every department of science, business, commerce, and life is controlled by certain fundamental laws that are basic to the preservation of the universe. Law has existed since the beginning. It will never end! God is the author of the law! The twin laws, that the seventh of our days and the tenth of our income shall be devoted in a special sense to God's service, have never been repealed or abrogated. Both have their foundation in human needs, and both are for our physical, material, mental, moral, or spiritual standpoint." It's just plain, downright, honesty to give the tithe.

If only church people would give their tithes, we never would have to have a fund-raising drive of any type!

Someone has aptly stated, "No man can pay tithes from a correct sense of duty without taking God into partnership in everything by which he makes his living. God furnishes all capital any of us have, be it hands, brains, strength, skill, or inherited money or property.

"It is not the amount of money God wants: He wants us, wants our confidence, our affection, our trust in Him, as a good, wise, loving partner."

It is a fact that most churches are looking for some remedy to cure their financial ills, for it is obvious many churches do not have a sound financial plan and are hampered and suffering accordingly.

There is no system better than God's system! Jesus came to fulfill the law, not to destroy it. He came to give it a deeper, fuller meaning; He came to add to it a spiritual

dimension that the Old Testament economy did not provide.

From the Superintendent

The tithing system is not some quick scheme to pay old church debts. It is of nobler purpose than that.

It is not merely a substitute for other worn-out methods of attempting to raise money.

We cannot approach the encouragement of tithing to our people with the attitude, "We tried everything else, now let's try this."

It is not a cure-all for the many ills of the church. It doesn't mean that you won't have any more problems. It will alleviate a big problem, however.

Primarily and fundamentally the main drive is not for the money at all. It has to do with something higher and more noble than this.

The main purpose or motive of the tithing system is to teach men to put God and His Kingdom first! With many professing Christians, self, home, business, and pleasure come first. After time, attention, energy and money have been given to other things, if there is any left, the Kingdom of God may get it. God takes last place instead of first. The main objective, therefore, must be to reverse the order. When a person is asked to become a tither, he is asked to establish as a life's principle the habit of putting God first. This, of course, gets the tithe, but it does vastly more; it gets the tithers.

It is to teach people to recognize and acknowledge God's ownership. God owns the property, land, money, and income which we call our own. We do not ask a man to pay the tithe to the preacher or to some special drive, but to God what already belongs to God. He gives us nine-tenths. If a Christian will recognize God's ownership of the tithe, he will recognize God's ownership of all. If he reaches such a recognition, he will give his tithe from a high spiritual motive. He renders to God the things which belong to Him.

It is important to teach men that God's ration of giving is the tenth. Some have given when they felt like it. Others give what their fathers or grandfathers gave. Others give as little as possible and still maintain a semblance of religious self-respect. God's ratio through the ages has been and still is the tithe. We are to give

New President Named for Southwestern College of Christian Ministries

Bethany, OK - The Board of Directors of Southwestern College of Christian Ministries (SCCM) named the Rev. Bob Ely as the new president of the school. Ely is an SCCM alumnus and a native of Oklahoma from Anadarko.

The Board of Directors reached its decision on Saturday, June 6. The new president was scheduled to take office on July 1.

Rev. Ronald Q. Moore, former president of SCCM, resigned in December 1997. He and his wife Doris plan to move to Calhoun Falls, South Carolina, where they will be pastoring the Calhoun Falls Pentecostal Holiness Church. Moore served as president of SCCM for eight years. Recently, he was elected as assistant superintendent of the Upper South Carolina Conference.

The Rev. Ely was a 4.0 student at the University of Oklahoma and Southwestern College of Christian Ministries. He has been an ordained minister in the International Pentecostal Holiness Church (IPHC) since 1967 and has served on the denomination's General Executive Board and the General Board of Administration. Presently, he is the president of the Association of North American Pentecostal Holiness Evangelists (NAPHE).

According to Dr. Dan Beller, chairman of the SCCM Board of Education, the Board's Executive Committee concurred that Bob Ely has the background and skills to lead Southwestern in reaching its goals. "Bob Ely has established himself as a man of influence in his denomination. He is a facilitator with a vision for the college," he said.

SCCM is a four-year school of Christian ministries, located adjacent to the Resource Development Center of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church in Bethany. At its fall 1997 meeting, the SCCM Board of Directors approved the expansion of the school's curriculum to include liberal arts studies. SCCM is

LINES FROM LINDA...

Well, here I go again! Another trip down Memory Lane! There is something about these hot, lazy days of summer that just remind me of my childhood years. Life on the farm in the summertime was really an exciting time. Some of my earliest memories are of following my mother in the garden as she picked the beans and tomatoes. I remember playing hide and seek in the corn field with my brothers and sisters. I remember my daddy riding me on the tobacco truck behind the mule. Better still, my great uncle did not have a car, so my cousin and I often got to ride to the store with him in his cart as the mule pulled us along. I remember picking huckleberries from the woods beside our house. I remember going wading in the mud holes. I remember the cool water from the well just outside the back door. I remember calling the "doodle bugs" from the holes in the sand.

Oh, no! It wasn't all fun and games. Summer time was also work time. By the time we got old enough to work, each of us had jobs to do. In the early springtime, the planting started. We looked forward to helping our daddy empty the fertilizer into buckets for him to feed into the dispenser on the tractor. A trip to the nearby country store to get a candy bar and Coca Cola was our pay. In a few weeks, we would see Daddy sharpening the hoes; and we knew it was chopping time. I'll never forget those long rows and how wonderful it was to get to the end to find that Moma had brought us a jar of cold water. Worse than the chopping was pulling weeds from the cotton and soybeans. When the crops were ready for harvest, we had to rise early. Daddy would make the rounds to pick up the farm hands, and we would work hard all day. A special treat each day was Moma's home-cooked country "dinners" in the middle of the day. No matter how many were working, Moma always had enough to go around. Fresh vegetables, which she had picked from her garden, and homemade biscuits or baked corn bread were sure to be a part of the menu. The days were hot, and we were tired: but come evening, all it took to refresh us was a bath and clean clothes. Then we were ready for the freedom of summer nights.

In the earlier years, our nighttime activities included family gatherings on the front porch. We all enjoyed the swing. Pretending the porch was a stage, we children would put on a talent show of songs and recitations. We chased "lightning bugs" and swatted mosquitoes. We played "ain't no bear out tonight." We sometimes had friends over and made candy. As we grew up, we were given the freedom to ride into town with friends for an ice cream cone or a visit to the local drive-in restaurant for french fries.

The older I get, the more I appreciate the values I learned during those summer days when our family learned what it means to work together. I realize that it was the lessons I learned then that formed my work ethic for life. I am also thankful for the times we played together and the opportunities we had to share our inner selves with each other in a no-fear environment.

That brings me to the thought I want to leave with you. As Christians, we are family. It is so important that we work together, each doing our part in the work of the Lord. It is also equally important that we take time to fellowship and have fun with each other. It is necessary that we build bonds that allow us to freely express our concerns and anxieties with each other without fear of judgment and rejection. I was so blessed to have a wonderful and loving earthly father, but we are even more blessed that our Heavenly Father is watching over us. Let's determine to please Him as He watches His children in action during these days of summer.

SUMMER RECIPES

offerings beyond this, but we haven't really give until the tithe has been given.

It is to teach that tithing is an act of worship. Someone has said that worship is self-giving unto God. A man's money is part of himself: his brain, his brawn, his energy. When he gives the money he has received, he gives a part of himself back to God. He is not merely answering a temporary money shortage in the church. It is worship. He goes to the Lord's house, on the Lord's day; he mingles with the Lord's people; he partakes of the Lord's Supper; and he puts into the Lord's treasury the Lord's money. It is a supreme act of worship. If the people of the church will worship with the tithe in this way, then we will be lifted from any act of being a selfish, negligent, self-satisfied church.

The main purpose, therefore, is to secure, not the tithe, but the tither; not the gift, but the giver; not the money, but the man; not the possession, but the possessor.

One of the main objections to tithing is they cannot afford it. They look at it from the money side. The starting point is the person. We must forget the money for a while and look at ourselves. Can we afford to put God first in our lives? The fact that we claim to be Christian presumes the fact that we are dedicated to Christ! We have confessed Christ! We have promised to be His disciple. We are part of His body, the church!

If we deny Christ that God-appointed portion of our money as well as all of us, it will lead to a life of selfishness! This produces mental, moral, physical, material, and worst of all, spiritual problems. The only solution to that basic problem is to give oneself unconditionally to God!

Please read Acts 4:32-5:10.

In conclusion: Give with no strings attached!

Give, expecting no reward!

Do not give to copy others!

Do not pretend to give more or more liberally than you do!

God will bless a cheerful giver!

- I. A HERITAGE OF PLACES. The history of the successes of the North Carolina Conference is forever linked to the geographical location known as FALCON, NORTH CAROLINA. Not even the most metropolitan among us can escape the debt we owe to the small hamlet of Falcon, the birthplace of our denomination. A place God chose in His wisdom to bless beyond man's wildest dream. How many of us were credentialed to preach at this place? How may of us first walked an aisle to an altar in a youth camp in this place? And what about those other special places, the many churches that were equal to Falcon in impact in their own communities in those earlier years with their message of the Holiness faith and the Pentecostal power?
- II. A HERITAGE OF PEOPLE. We owe a debt to every leader who has served this our conference. However unlikely a leader some of them might have seemed in the natural, God chose them and singled them out and anointed them, and the magnitude of the success of their ministries has testified to the integrity of their calling and election. We cannot forget these special servants of God who made paths for us to follow.
- III. A HERITAGE OF PRECEPTS. As important as the places and people who put our church on the worldwide map are, they are important only because they were faithful to preach the whole counsel of God without fear or favor.

In those earlier years, we were known primarily as

"holiness" churches. This label was given to us because we preached and determined to live the message of Sanctification. Our distinction was the life of purity that we encouraged in a lifestyle that separated our people from the overt carnality of the world around us. If we are to enter the new millennium with any degree of power and lasting influence, we must "stir up our PURE minds" by remembering the message that God honored and blessed then. Being the same yesterday, today, and forever, He will honor and bless proper stewardship of the message of Holiness all over again.

IV. A HERITAGE OF PRINCIPLES. P. H. people were always people of strong convictions. We were way ahead of our time in condemning addictive habits that bound lives and spirits of men and women and youth. Bible principles became the sure foundation upon which our churches were established. The hallmark of our faith was "delivered by men," whose testimony told of the power of God available to all mankind. We pulled down strongholds and cast down imaginations, and in the place of diabolic influence, we rejoiced our way through the "old time victory" at altars dedicated to the unadulterated principles of Bible convictions.

GOD IS CALLING US BACK! Not back in time, but back to the Bible. Back to a simple complete trust in God's Word and His Sovereign power. Back to adequate STEWARDSHIP OF OUR HERITAGE.

"tis Grace hath brought [us] safe thus far, and Grace will lead [us] home." AMEN.

CAMPUS RENOVATION PROJECT

In February of 1997 we began using the new Training Center. Using this facility has reaffirmed the Conference Board's conviction that a center for training and various Conference functions was a good idea and will be an invaluable asset to our planning for the outreach ministry of this Conference. The increased use of the Training Center will necessitate overnight accommodations on campus. This compelling need is being addressed in the planned renovation of the School Building Dorm.

This project will provide us with 20 sleeping rooms, two more training classrooms, and an entrance lounge. The cost of renovation is about one-half the cost of a new building for the same amount of space.

Due to the debt load existing on the Training Center it would not be prudent to finance this project with more borrowed money. Neither can we afford to wait longer to begin the repairs. We need this building now. Also, the longer we wait to renovate, the greater the cost will be due to deterioration of the building and the possible inflation of building costs. It is time to restore the Dorm. When God leads He also provides and the people and churches of this great Conference obeying God's direction can underwrite this project so we can refurbish the Dorm **DEBT FREE**.

I believe God is speaking to us to give \$300,000.00 IN 300 DAYS to liquidate the cost of renewing the Dorm. It would only take \$3.34 a day for 300 days for 300 people to give \$300,000.00. Even if all of us cannot give \$1,000.00 each, the combined gifts of many will

assure the success of the project.

The architect's sketch below shows how the Dorm will connect with the Training Center with the covered walkway. Also the dormers with windows for the upstairs rooms are visible. A metal roof to match the new Training Center will give the buildings a compatible resemblance. The Dorm will be brought into compliance with all building and safety codes and an entrance for the disabled will also be provided.

While the Conference finances cannot support a loan of this magnitude, we can borrow short-term funds as construction money, and we are prepared to do this as soon as the contractor is available to begin the work. However, we need to be prepared to pay off those loans when the renovation work is complete.

We have more than 23,000 members in our 180 churches and a joint effort of individuals and churches can easily guarantee a **DEBT FREE** building ready for use next spring.

Please prayerfully consider this urgent need and then contact me at the Conference Office assuring me of your participation in the new project. You may write me at P.O. Box 149, Falcon, NC 28342. Your commitment should be completed in 300 days, or by the last of June 1999.

LINES FROM LINDA...

Several weeks ago our Sunday School lesson began with the question, "If you could ask God anything you wanted to know, what would you ask?" Immediately someone answered, "Why do bad things happen to good people?" Little did I know the impact the discussion which followed would have on me in the next few weeks.

On that very Sunday morning, before leaving for church, I had called one of my best friends who was being hospitalized for heart surgery the next day. On Monday, during a presurgery procedure, her heart was punctured causing hemorrhaging and loss of oxygen to her brain. The upper cortex of her brain was damaged to the point that she had been declared brain dead. She went into the operating room with high expectations of improving her health and came out with the opposite result. For several days everyone held on to the hope that she would come out of what seemed to be a comatose state; but as the days continued to pass, reality set in. Bettie would not recover without a miracle.

For more than 30 years, Bettie and I have shared a special friendship. Our husbands, both named Joe, have also been good friends and business partners. Our anniversaries are two days apart, thus we shared many anniversary celebrations together. We took trips together as couples and shared family vacations, birthdays, and special occasions. At Christmas time, we usually had our families together to celebrate — always ending up around the piano singing Christmas carols. Our lives and the lives of our children are very closely intertwined.

One of the reasons we mesh so well is our shared value system. God and family are the centerpieces of our lives. Bettie always exhibited strong faith. She looked for the good in people. Because of successful business ventures, she could easily have become proud and put herself on a pedestal; but she never changed from the humble person I met more than 30 years ago. She is the ideal mother and grandmother and a friend to all who know her. She is truly a good person!

I will admit to you, I have gone through a spiritual struggle trying to make sense of what has happened. When Bettie was declared brain dead, she was still attached to a ventilator. I wondered if her soul was still present. I searched the Word of God to help me find answers. I was led to the Genesis account of the creation and determined that it was when God breathed the breath of life into Adam that he became a living soul. When the doctors unhooked Bettie from the machines, she continued to breathe on her own. I know now that her soul is still present.

I look at her now. It appears that she is asleep. No movement! No outward responses! It seems so long to me since our conversation on that Sunday morning, but I suppose time means nothing to her. Although the doctors say she has

no realization of any of her surroundings, the machines have shown some variation when loved ones talk to her. So we continue to talk to Bettie and share the events of our lives. Somehow I believe that she is hearing, and who knows but what she is communing with God and interceding in our behalf.

It is not within me to understand why this happened to my friend. Yet, I know in whom I believe and I am persuaded that God is able to keep what I commit to Him. It is not always easy to pray "Thy will be done" and to truly commit it all to Him. I still yearn for Bettie's restoration and still pray for the miracle. I do, however, have a peace in knowing that God has it all in control, and He is walking with us through this time...a time when a bad thing has happened to a good person!

PRAISE IN THE MIDST OF THE STORM...

It was an early Friday evening in October, 1995. Bobby and I were relaxing from a long day when we heard a knock at the utility room door. We realized it couldn't be anyone we knew for no one ever knocked on that door. Bobby directed them to the right entrance; and as we suspected, a man whom we didn't know stepped up. As he came nearer to the light, we realized he was holding up our 30-year-old son. Tom had been severely beaten. After inquiring, we learned that the man had not harmed Tom but had reached out to help him. Bobby thanked him for his kindness, helped our son inside, and the stranger left.

Our son's face was bloody and very swollen. Bobby asked Tom who had beaten him, to which he answered, "Five strangers." We guided him to his bedroom and helped him in bed. I tried to make conversation, but realized he was in serious condition. We learned that he had received several strikes on his head with the heel of a boot. By this time, we knew Tom needed medical attention. We eventually called 911 for assistance.

Around 11 p.m. I sat in the emergency room. Bobby and our daughter, Sherri, came from Tom's side back to where I was waiting. They tried to appear calm to avoid upsetting me more than I already was. I knew they were trying to protect me, but a mother can't be kept from her child in crisis. When I reached Tom's bedside, I recognized the nurse attending him. She readily told me that his condition was very serious and that his brain may be bleeding.

In a few minutes, a neurosurgeon was on the scene. I think we will always remember his words, "I am a brain surgeon. Your son has a blood clot on the right side of his brain and if I don't do surgery, he's going to die." Our daughter questioned

whether the surgery would save him. The doctor matter-offactly stated, "I didn't say that, but if I don't operate right now, he will die. I have to run." With that, he literally ran out of the room.

Around 1:30 a.m. we were escorted to a surgical waiting room. It seemed that everything began to spin, and I began to cry. After calling family and friends, we went to the hospital chapel. As soon as we walked in, I felt a holy presence that only God's children can identify. I didn't know what to ask God for. Suddenly I felt impressed to praise God in the midst of the storm. Something fell on my shoulders as if it were a warm blanket; and with it, I felt a peace that only Christians can feel. We knew that our son would survive this crisis. As we walked back into the waiting room, family and friends had come in. Bobby and Anne Williams were like two angels as they walked in to offer their prayers and support.

After surgery early that Saturday morning, we were told Tom would be in neurological intensive care for at least five days. However, he actually returned home the following Monday afternoon. His healing was rapid and he returned to his job of brick laying one week after brain surgery.

Praise will get the job done. Try it! Praise God even in the midst of the storm!

1998 SUMMER INTERNS

Each year the Conference Evangelism Ministries promotes and supports a summer internship program. The purpose of the internship program is to help provide on-the-field training for ministerial students. For those churches who qualify the Conference Evangelism Ministries will provide a supplement to the local church of \$400.00.

To be eligible for the assistance a church must provide an internship program of at least eight weeks. The intern must work at least forty hours per week at the local church. He or she must be properly supervised by the pastor. It is preferred that the intern be a student at one of the denominational schools. Proper reports shall be completed for the department or copies of school reports be filed with the Conference.

The program has proven to be very fruitful for the Conference. This year the Conference had four interns, they are:

"GO" OFFERING UPDATE

The World Evangelism Service on the closing night of camp meeting was an outstanding service. Several missionaries were present. It was a special time of emphasis for world evangelism.

During the missions part of the service some \$192,000.00 plus was pledged or given by the churches for the 1998 "GO" Offering. A special "GO" Offering was taken. Over \$4,000.00 was given. The offering and grand total (approximately \$196,000.00) were new records.

We are a little short of our goal - \$200,000.00. It is hoped that by year's end we will reach the goal and for the first time break the \$200,000.00 barrier for Global Outreach. Perhaps there are individuals who have not given and would like to do so. Perhaps some of the churches have some undesignated missions funds that could be given.

To date 27 churches/pastors have qualified for the Incentive Program. These pastors will receive a gift certificate to LifeSprings Resources. Ninety-six churches have turned in an increase over 1997. Nine other churches gave the same as last year. Forty-one churches have mailed in their offering which is a decrease compared to 1997. Twenty-nine churches have not mailed in their pledges. To-date \$176,000.00 has actually been received.

"GO" Offerings, in order to count for 1998, must be received in Falcon by November 30th or in Oklahoma City by December 31st.

One hundred ninety-seven pastors, ministers, and local church missions leaders have pledged/given a Day's Wage for the 1998 offering. These will be receiving a special "1998 'GO' Offering Leader" miniature globe for their desk. These will be made available to all Day's Wage contributors in 1999.

God is at work in missions! He is using the N. C. Conference.

Superintendent's Page

Church leadership from local church non-clergy personnel to the General Superintendent are constantly searching for assistance to enable us to excel. We desire to excel for the glory of God, the evangelization of the non-Christian, and the edifying of the Body of Christ, His Church.

One of the resources that has been very helpful to me in the past few months is the "The McIntosh Church Growth Network." Dr. Gary L. McIntosh is professor of Christian Ministry and Leadership at Talbot School of Theology. You may subscribe to CGN by writing to P.O. Box 892589, Temecula, CA 92589-2589. I believe you will discover this monthly service to be extremely valuable.

A sizable portion of the one hundred eighty three churches and missions in this conference qualify as "small churches." Good resource material is seemingly not as plentiful for "small churches" as for some others. I believe you will agree with me that the following copy of CGN for August, 1998 is an excellent article on the "Growth Obstacles for the Small Church." (This is copied with permission from Dr. Gary L. McIntosh.)

GROWTH OBSTACLES FOR THE SMALL CHURCH

A warm rain was coming down as Bob arrived for our weekly discussion. He arrived at 7:30 sharp. After we exchanged cordial greetings, I shared my frustration about visitors who come to my church but do not return.

"Sounds like you're facing a common problem of all churches," Bob explained.

"What's that?" I asked.

"Barriers!"

"Barriers?"

"Yes," Bob emphasized. "Barriers! Or another term is Growth Obstacles. All churches have barriers or obstacles which exclude people."

"What do you mean churches exclude people?" I asked a little indignantly. "My church is open to anyone who wants to come."

"I'm not surprised you feel that way," Bob replied. "Nearly all church members feel their church is open, friendly, and accepting. A few years ago I was asked to share the story of my church's growth with several small congregations. Each time I spoke, I asked the people to tell me the best thing about their own church. The number one answer each church gave was 'We're a friendly church.' Of course, the interesting fact was none of those churches was growing."

"Sounds a lot like my church," I admitted. "No church excludes people on purpose," Bob continued. "Yet, the truth is there are numerous obstacles or barriers to a church's growth. Some of these are invisible but many can be seen if we look for them. Let me give you some examples.

"Some visitors may see the name of the church as a barrier. Perhaps they experienced the pain of rejection in a previous church with a similar name. The name of the church may bring back to memory their personal hurt and it is an invisible barrier that must be removed before they can settle into a church. A visible barrier that is common in older churches is a stairway. Numerous steps or stairs are obstacles to some people who might attend church."

"I can identify with that obstacle," I declared. "The fellowship hall in my church is located in the basement and the only way to get there is down a long flight of stairs. A few of our people don't come to church fellowships because the stairs are too difficult to manage."

"Yes," my mentor agreed, "and without knowing it, your church excludes those who can't traverse the stairs. Fortunately, churches have become more aware of physical barriers and are taking steps to remove them. The list of obstacles is far longer and more complex than most members realize, but since we don't have much time today, let's look at the five main growth obstacles for smaller churches."

"Before I summarize each of these obstacles," Bob cautioned, "it's important to remember that God has not created any two congregations exactly alike. However, there are enough similarities among churches that common barriers to their growth and development are easily listed."

Briefly, Bob's five growth obstacles for small churches are summarized as follows.

Obstacle 1 for small churches is a small church image.

Smaller churches often believe they are too small to give anything of significance to the people in their community. Thus they retreat into a protective shell and fail to penetrate their community with Christ's love.

This small church image results in a low level of congregational morale which creates a feeling that 'We could never do that!' or 'That would never work here!' Low morale is often created when 1) leaders set the church up for failure by establishing unreachable goals, 2) victories are not celebrated, 3) leaders lose the trust of the congregation, 4) church-wide decisions are manipulated, and 5) promises are left unfulfilled.

Obstacle 2 for small churches is ineffective evangelism.

Many small churches find that low self-esteem causes them to withdraw rather than intentionally reach out to lost people with the love of Christ. This results in small churches evangelizing only their immediate families, a few people whom they "adopt" into the family,

PENTECOSTAL HOLINESS HOMEGROWN DENOMINATION RETAINS ITS DISTINCTIVES

Professing Christians in the United States have always been robustly diverse in their preferences. They trust more in a wide range of churches, denominations, liturgies, and beliefs than in any overarching canon or authority. Even the largest, Roman Catholics and Southern Baptists, are rife with internal contradictions and disputes.

Within this richness of expression, the Pentecostal Holiness Church stands out among the most appealing of the smaller denominations. Small it may be, but it gives no quarter in its zeal for its faith.

This is also homegrown religion, and the native soil is right here along the upper Cape Fear River.

The town of Falcon in northeastern Cumberland County is something like the Rome of Pentecostal Holiness' history. Beginning in the 1890s, the intense "awakening" that is a Pentecostal distinctive spread among the congregations of Methodists, Baptists, and other denomination in this part of the country.

Julius Culbreth experienced it, and became the founder of the Pentecostal Holiness church in Falcon. The church's growth flamed in the next few years, taking in such other denominations as the "Fire Baptized Holiness Church."

From the Culbreth beginning grew a denomination that now has its conference headquarters in Falcon. Culbreth also built one of North Carolina's most admired church structures, the Octagon Tabernacle, an angular, eight-sided gem of architecture that has been lovingly preserved since 1898.

All this comes together this year when the church observes its 100th birthday with a "Seize the Future" forum in November that will focus on Pentecostal Holiness' direction for the 21st century, as well as a \$15,000 fund drive to spiff up the Octagon Tabernacle for the occasion.

In its 100th year, the down-to-earth piety and dedication to service that grew from the awakenings of its earliest adherents still inform and warm the Pentecostal Holiness Church. It deserves a happy birthday.

LOIS RACHEL BIZZELL

Wife of Rev. Tom Ed Bizzell December 20, 1925 - June 26, 1998

Rachel Rogers Bizzell was not just an everyday run-of-the-mill lady. In my eyes, she was the epitome of what a Christian should be. She was faithful as a wife, mother of eight, friend, sister, sister-in-law, aunt and to her 17 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren and great-great child. She could be trusted. Her family and friends did truly "rise and call her blessed." She labored faithfully beside Daddy (Rev. Tom Ed Bizzell) not only in their harvest of vegetables, but especially souls.

As a small child I remember the impact her prayer life had on me. From wanting a close parking place to needing her washing machine fixed, she prayed and God answered. We would pull into that parking spot and she would say, "Thank you, Lord." I'll never forget when the washer started working on its own after she prayed for it. Those may seem like small things, but they left a big impression on me. She trusted her friend Jesus and He was always faithful to her.

Her ministry in song was anointed. The Holy Spirit moved when she sang—on her, if nobody else. I recall her singing, "This is Just What Heaven Means to Me." Now she knows what

LINES FROM LINDA

Several years ago I heard Rev. Raymond Potter preach a sermon titled, *Second Fiddle*. In that sermon he emphasized the fact that everybody is not designed to play first fiddle. He also stressed how much more beautiful the music of the first fiddle is when the harmony of the second fiddle is added. Before he finished the sermon, many people in our congregation saw how important their role is in God's work.

Recently I read in *Temple Tidings* (Northwood Temple's newsletter) an article which Rev. John Hedgepeth had written regarding the same matter. I share portions of that article with you.

"All through the Bible you will find people who did great exploits. They were not the highest ranking or most notable people in the Bible. Many times scripture records just simple people doing mighty deeds, as it was in I Chronicles 11 regarding the mighty men of David. They were unknown and quickly forgotten. Who would remember Elhanan, the son of Dodo, or Shammoth or Helez and others? Yet, the scripture says that they did great and mighty things for God.

"And now there are men and women who are hardly known, who dare to step out and attempt great things for God...like Daniel Nash. Who would remember Daniel Nash? He was the little-known and seldom-seen partner of Charles Finney. He had a lackluster record as pastor in upstate New York. He decided to give himself over totally to prayer for Finney's meetings. "Father Nash" would go into town quietly three weeks before the meetings and pray.

"Just before he died in 1831, Daniel Nash wrote, 'I am now convinced, it is my duty and privilege, and the duty of every other Christian to pray for the Holy Spirit as much as on the day of Pentecost, and a great deal more. My body is in pain, but I am happy in my God.' Within four months, Nash was dead. His obscure grave is in a neglected cemetery along a dirt road in New York. His tombstone reads:

Daniel Nash Laborer with Finney Mighty in Prayer November 17, 1775 – December 20, 1831"

Brother Hedgepeth's article emphasizes that it is not always the person in the spotlight who is being used of God to do great and mighty things for His kingdom. He closes with the challenge to "attempt great things for God."

It doesn't matter what "fiddle" we play. If we commit to God and do our very best to play it well and according to his leading, it will result in beautiful music!

The following poem summarizes the message:

If we can't be a pine on the top of the hill,

Be a scrub in the valley, but be
The best little scrub by the side of the rill,

Be a bush if you can't be a tree.

If you can't be a bush be a bit of the grass,
And some highway happier make.

If you can't be a muskie, then just be a bass,
But the liveliest bass in the lake.

We can't all be captains; we've got to have crew.

There's something for all of us here.

There's big work to do, and there's lesser to do,
And the task you must do is the near.

If you can't be a highway, then just be a trail;

A RECIPE OF LOVE

(The following is taken from *A Matter of Taste*, the Kinston First Women's Ministries newly-published cookbook, and was written from the heart of the pastor's wife.)

In the thirty-five years I have been a minister's wife, parishioners have often honored our family by inviting us to share a meal with them. Have you ever considered all the work that is involved in preparing a meal for guests? Have you thought of the closeness you feel toward a family after you have "broken bread" with them? As a prelude to A Matter of Taste, I would like to share with you my views on the role food can play in establishing friendships, maintaining fellowship and restoring broken relationships.

Sometimes going into the home of people you barely know can be a very interesting situation. As a young ministering couple at Emmanuel College, we once accepted an invitation for Sunday lunch with folks we hardly knew. We walked into their elegantly decorated home. When we came into the formal dining area, I felt awkward and afraid. I had never seen a home like this, let alone been inside. I certainly had never dined at such a lavishly set table. The china held some foods that I could not even identify! What if I dropped one of the their obviously expensive goblets and broke it?

Looking at all the polished silver on the table I began to think of the riches of these people. Out of my comfort zone, I felt terribly uneasy. As everyone was seated, the hostess asked my husband to say the blessing. As he prayed a sudden calmness came over me that I have never forgotten. We were in the home of God's people. They wanted us to feel at home and enjoy the dinner they had graciously prepared for us. So, instead of feeling afraid and intimidated, I began to concentrate on getting to know our hosts and allowing them to get to know me.

I learned that day that sharing a meal is a wonderful way to begin a new friendship. It is also a great way to maintain fellowship. Of course, meal preparation is no small feat. Heaven is like. I now have more to go to Heaven for than I had before. She is experiencing what she worked for her whole life. Those songs were not just songs to her. They were her life and her testimony and everybody knew it. I have fond memories of sitting on mama's knee listening to her sing during our years in the Bailey Church. (This is how I obtained an ear for singing alto.)

I emptied her nest as I left for Holmes College of the Bible in 1980. It was hard for her but she knew God had a purpose in my life. It was not until then that I discovered her keen sense of humor. When she came on the Holmes/Emmanuel trip to visit me, the ladies traveling with her told me that she was the life of the trip. I was surprised. I had never seen that side of her because she was always so busy raising children, working in the fields, and serving the church along side of Daddy.

When the Lord called us to Oklahoma to work at Southwestern College of Christian Ministries, Mama was so supportive even though she wasn't thrilled for me to be so far away from home. She said, "You have to follow the leading of the Lord, Ginger." My biggest fear about living so far away was what I have just experienced with her sickness and death. Upon arriving home for Thanksgiving last year, we discovered that she had been admitted to the hospital. She was there for the duration of our visit. Little did we know that would be the last time my husband John and our children Karen, 13, and Rachel, 9, would see her alive on this earth. Since we came home for Thanksgiving we stayed in Oklahoma for Christmas. We did not realize that would be the last Christmas she would be with us. By the way, it was the first Christmas I ever spent away from my family.

Late in April I made last minute reservations to fly home during a critical time in her sickness. I never imagined those ten days were my last days with her on this earth. I knew it was a possibility, but I felt sure she would get better and the next time I would come home she would be well. She came off the respirator a few days after I arrived. I walked into her room and for 30 to 40 minutes she laid there whispering, "Thank you Jesus, Thank you Lord." When she wasn't thanking Him, she was speaking in tongues. I thought, "How could she be thankful in the shape she was in?" What a blessing she was! I was there to support her. However, in the time I spent with her she was encouraging to me.

or relying solely on the pastor to reach new people for Christ. None of these approaches to evangelism are effective over the long haul.

Small churches can be extremely effective in outreach. However, in order to overcome this barrier, they must develop three aspects of ministry: a sense of mission, a sense of urgency, and an open fellowship.

Obstacle 3 for small churches is inadequate programming.

Every pastor of a small church has experienced sadness upon losing people due to the lack of programming. Parents of teenagers often leave a small church to find a larger church with an active youth program. Musicians leave smaller churches to become involved in a church offering a greater variety of music. Creative people move to other churches to find additional outlets for their new approaches to ministry.

A contributing factor to inadequate programming in small churches is the cutback syndrome. With the best of intentions, leaders cut back on staff, programs, maintenance, and outreach to save the church money. Regrettably, cutting back to save money reduces potential for reaching new people and assimilating them into the church.

Obstacle 4 for small churches is downward momentum.

God in His infinite wisdom allowed her to be off the respirator while I was there to give us a chance say goodbye — although I didn't realize it would be our last goodbye. Before my plane touched down in Oklahoma, she was back on the respirator.

The nurses who cared for Mama told us that they knew there was a higher power present and working in her behalf. She was being a witness for Christ and she was barely conscious. What a lesson for us! Many people have told me how she encouraged them and even brought them out of depression – gave them hope. They just felt better after talking to her.

She was a teacher in many ways to many people. She may not have stood in front of a Sunday school class, but she taught by the life she lived before others day in and day out. I never heard her and Daddy have cross words. I'm sure they had disagreements, but we never heard them. I also never knew they had church problems because they didn't air their problems. What a testimony! They have suffered many heartaches – especially when they lost Ruth in 1992. But they always stood true and trusted in God. Mama and Ruth are together now.

She was a fighter even until the end. She was so strong. She was so loved. During my family's bereavement, I could hardly believe all the food, paper products, sodas, flowers, and people that poured in for support. We were reaping the benefits of the many bowls of collards and chicken pastry she had prepared for the bereaved. She could cook! Homemade biscuits, pies and cakes graced our table almost every meal. She was a special lady. I don't just say that now because she's gone. I am so fortunate to have such a wonderful heritage. I believe in giving people their praises while they're still alive. I expressed my love and appreciation to both my parents in separate letters before I moved to Oklahoma. If this article does nothing else, let me encourage you to tell those that you love how you feel about them. Take every opportunity to do something special for your loved ones while they are alive. I can't say I have a lot of regrets because I had a good relationship with my mother and I am thankful for that. Of course she is a big part of why I am who I am today. I don't know what my future ministry holds but my desire is to take the mantle that she left and make a difference for good in the lives of people as she did everywhere she went.

bottom of a sink full of water, you will comprehend this obstacle. Once the downward pull of the water begins, it pulls everything else along with it. This is precisely the case in many small churches, particularly those which have declined from a larger size. Once a church begins declining, retreating inward, and cutting back on ministry, it becomes next to impossible to focus on anything but survival. That is why for many smaller churches the number one priority is survival.

Obstacle 5 for small churches is ingrown fellowship.

This obstacle may be the primary one confronting small churches. The longer a church remains small, and the longer it is in existence, the more ingrown the fellowship structures become. The normal fellowship structures -groups, classes, circles - become so full they can no longer absorb outsiders. If the church has a high age profile, i.e., the people in the congregation are older, the ingrownness can be heightened.

Now that I know where the blockages are, it will be much easier to design a strategy to remove them from my church.

Which of these obstacles are found in your church? What steps can you take to remove them? When can you begin?

North Carolina November 22-24

Wayne County Courthouse Goldsboro, North Carolina November 22 2 p.m.

The Centennial festivities will move to the East Coast and Goldsboro, North Carolina, on November 22, as participants gather for prayer and praise on the steps of the Wayne County Courthouse. A bronze plaque commemorates the birthplace of the Goldsboro church.

The First Pentecostal Holiness Church in Goldsboro claims the distinction as the first local fellowship organized as a Pentecostal Holiness Church. The congregation will have celebrated its Centennial Homecoming in a special service on Sunday morning.

On Monday evening, the Gospel Tabernacle Choir in Dunn, North Carolina, will present a reminiscent musical program that will carry participants back to the turn of the Century and the revival that became known as "Azusa Street East." The evening will feature a dramatization of the Reverend G. B. Cashwell, the Pentecostal Holiness preacher who held a month-long revival in 1907 that revolutionized the Holiness Movements in the South.

"Cashwell issued special invitations to ministers of the Holiness Church, the Fire-Baptized Holiness Church, and the holiness element of the Free-Will Baptist Church to attend...Preachers listened in awe as Cashwell spoke with other tongues and encouraged others to seek the Pentecostal Baptism" (*The Old-Time Power*, Vinson Synan).

Scores of people experienced the infilling of the Holy Spirit at the Dunn Revival. Some preachers of note in the Pentecostal Holiness Church who received their Pentecost at Dunn included G. F. Taylor, A. H. Butler, J. A. Culbreth, M. D. Seller, R. B. Jackson, and W. B. Strickland. These men took the message to many communities in North Carolina.

Bishop James Leggett will close the service with a message that will focus the church on the opportunities of a new millennium.

Falcon, North Carolina November 24 11 a.m.

Falcon Children's Home will help the church celebrate its Centennial by hosting a "birthday party" as part of its annual Harvest Train activities. At 11 o'clock on Tuesday morning, the administration, staff, and residents of the Home will present a program that will include music and drama, and will climax with the presentation of a special birthday cake.

J. A. Culbreth incorporated and opened Falcon Orphanage in 1909. On April 7, 1943, Falcon Children's Home was transferred to the Pentecostal Holiness Church, and it has remained a significant, benevolent ministry of the church. The Home serves children who are orphaned or from dysfunctional families.

2:30 - 4 p.m.

Following lunch in the Conference Dining Hall, the Centennial Celebration will continue in the **Culbreth Memorial Tabernacle** with a "family reunion" at 2:30. Special guests have been invited to attend from the Congregational Holiness Church, the United Holy Church of America, The Pentecostal Free-Will Baptist Church, the Emmanuel Holiness Church, and the Fire-Baptized Holiness Church of God of the Americas. A multimedia presentation by Dr. Vinson Synan will help the church appreciate her rich history in the grace of God.

5 - 6 p.m.

At 5 p.m. a Seize-the-Future Forum will convene in the **Octagon Tabernacle** in Falcon. This small, octagon-shaped building was the site of the signing of the merger between the Pentecostal Holiness Church and the Fire-Baptized Holiness Church on January 30, 1911.

The Forum will conclude with a brief challenge by Bishop James D. Leggett titled "Into the Twenty-first Century."

Is Sunday School a Dinosaur in a **Technological World?**

If you were at District Conference, you picked up on the fact that I am a "Sunday School man." I believe that a

strong Sunday School can be an integral of a Great Commission church - and every church can and should be of a Great Great Commission church!

Sunday School can part of the growth strategy be an integral part of the growth strategy Commission church.

Regarding the church, Jesus said three things: (1) it is His church: (2) He will build it: and (3) hell will not defeat it! (Matthew 16:18) Nowhere are we authorized to build churches ourselves except as part of our strategy in carrying out the Great Commission. Therefore all we do in church planting, all we do in church administration, all we do in church ministry must be designed to further that one goal — obeying the Great Commission. Matthew 28:19-20 makes it plain what we are to be spending our time and resources doing: winning, assimilating, and discipling.

If these are the work of the church, they are also the work of the Sunday School. It stands to reason that a Great Commission Sunday School will be accomplishing Great Commission purposes. In other words, Sunday School should not just be reflecting the growth in your church, it should be one of the primary growth producers in your church. If your Sunday School is not fueling growth, Author Ken Hemphill in his book Revitalizing the Sunday Morning Dinosaur, makes several assertions as to why this might be so.

He first lists loss of evangelistic focus as a prime cause. Few modern-day Sunday Schools have a clearly defined evangelistic focus. If you ask people why they attend Sunday School, they will probably say, "for Bible teaching." However, if you analyze most classes, you would find that fellowship was more a factor than systematic study of the Bible. In the majority of Sunday Schools, if the class is growing, it is because of the fellowship experienced. Fellowship is good, but it is not all there is to the Great Commission strategy of the church! The underlying goal of the church as a whole is evangelism, and this should be reflected in the Sunday School as well.

Second is loss of emphasis and commitment. As the evangelistic focus was lost, the excitement was lost, and when excitement waned, many pastors and church leaders lost their enthusiasm for Sunday School. Then we began to hear speakers say, "The day of Sunday School is over! It has served its purpose, but it is time to move on to something else, something more modern." The emphasis shifted to the once-a-week Morning Worship Service as the source of excitement in the church. However, people soon missed the closeness they knew in smaller group settings, so the Cell Group movement gained strength. Many modern churches say that Sunday School is dead, and has been replaced by Cell Group ministry. The interesting thing is that a Cell Ministry is considered

successful if 25% of Morning Worship crowd is involved, but most Sunday Schools include 60 to 80 percent of the Morning Worshipers! Amazingly, "old-fashioned" Sunday School has the potential to reach two to three times

as many people as Cell Ministry — if it is properly structured and promoted.

Third, he lists loss of vision for the total work of the Sunday School. A properly functioning Sunday School class will achieve three purposes: outreach, fellowship, and discipleship. The class that focuses solely on fellowship may lose sight of the need for winning the lost; the class that focuses purely on evangelism may bring them in, but fail to teach them to obey the commands of Christ, or even what those commands are; the class that is focused purely on Bible teaching may fail to make new people feel loved, appreciated, and wanted. A wellstructured Sunday School class will maintain a balanced commitment to the total work of the church.

Fourth, there is often a lack of a clear purpose statement. Every church ought to look at each of its activities and ask the question, "Why are we doing this?" If there is not a reason that clearly relates to the Great Commission in general, and the Mission of that church in specific, it may be time to re-evaluate the effectiveness of that activity. Every leader of every Sunday School class should know why the Sunday School exists and what

niche their class is designed to fill. Loss of a sense of purpose has crippled many churches and Sunday Schools.

Fifth is fear of innovation. Many people have an automatic fear of "changing things." Yet,

everything *outside* the church is changing! We have the task of carrying an unchanging gospel to an *ever-changing* world.

Our *message* remains ever the same, but our *methods* must change over time. Many Sunday School teachers are using the same teaching methods they (or their parents) used thirty years ago. Many Sunday School leaders are doing things exactly as their predecessors did two generations ago. Sunday School has been compared to a dinosaur. Many people believe that those great lizards died off because the world changed faster than they could adapt to those changes. Let's don't let this happen to the main "teaching arm" of our church! A Sunday School that is afraid of change will not effectively minister to the world of today.

Again, let me say it: Sunday School can be an integral part of the growth strategy of a Great Commission church. We must resist the urge to give up on something that has served the church well for many years. Let us rather look for ways to revitalize, revive, and fine-tune it to make it better. All the foregoing assertions may not apply to your church, but one or more does. Which one or ones apply? What are you willing to do about it?





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

Superintendent's Page

DIVINE GUIDANCE

T. Elwood Long

There is something beautiful and tender in the thought of the Lord our God offering to be our guide. This he has done in Psalm 32:8, "I will instruct thee, and teach thee in the way which thou shalt go: I will guide thee with mine eye."

Please consider with me the nature of Divine Guidance. "I will guide thee with mine eye." A glance of the eye is sufficient for the servant who is keenly watching his master. Even so, the Christian in fellowship and loving intimacy with God will have indications of His will which can be felt rather than explained or even proven. God's guidance is like a silk thread running throughout the entire fabric of our lives. There is no compulsion in God's guidance. It is offered to those who seek it and are willing to follow the way he makes known to each of us.

There is a negative aspect of God's guidance. This is the guidance of restraint. A voice which speaks to us and tells us "this is not the way." In the Biblical account of the Exodus of the children of Israel from Egypt we read, "God led them not through the way of the land of the Philistines, though that was near." God leads us in a safe way; safe for us according to our wisdom and strength. The easy and attractive way will not always be the right way for us. The wrong road of life has never yet led to the right place for life.

There is also a positive aspect of God's guidance. Jesus said, "To this end was I born and for this cause came I into the world." What a glorious comfort this fact gave the Son of God! In a measure we, too, may have this assurance of divine selection, direction and control. Christian biography gives many examples of devoted servants of God who have had an unwavering assurance that all their times were in God's hands. Therefore, their path of life and service was completely and joyfully acceptable to them as having been planned by God.

Praise God for the peace of His presence in the storms of life, His rest in times of trial, His courage in times of adversity. These attributes are the portion of those who know divine guidance with full assurance that He chooses our way. We must all seek that kind of guidance. The Word tells us concerning the Holy Spirit, "He shall guide you into all truth." If it is the path of life that has not yet been disclosed to us we can offer a prayer of confidence when we're able to say with the Psalmist, "Thou wilt show me the path of life."

We must constantly be aware that we must willingly accept Divine Guidance. It is a very happy thing when we're led to look to God for guidance in the early days of our life. If young people can learn early the holy habit of inquiring of the Lord concerning our ways they will escape many dangers, avoid many pitfalls and rid themselves of many potential sorrows.

God usually calls those whom He designs for important service in His Church and Kingdom very early in life. The silken thread of divine leading surrounds them and if they're willing, they can be tenderly drawn into the way of God's choosing by a gentle prodding from Him, provided they do not by sin or self-will break the fragile thread of His guidance.

The question of how we may perceive God's guidance is very important. The brevity of this article cannot adequately explore the answers to that question. However, let me briefly point out that for some things there is only the guidance of the Word of God needed. Nothing that cuts across the plain teaching of the scriptures can be from God, for the Spirit does not speak with two voices; only with one voice. Then there's the guidance that comes from the providence of God. His hand is on things and circumstances. He brings about the opening or closing of doors. We must observe the hand of God in all events and circumstances. Then of course there is the guidance of the Holy Spirit. God speaks in our spirits, especially in the moments when we are very near to Him in the intimacy of His love and the surrender of our total wills. When we bring our case to Him and abide in His presence, we wait for Him to speak. When we do this, we will receive an inward impulse toward or against what we have brought before Him in earnest prayer.

When we face questions as to what path to choose or what decision to make, please remember as we face the challenge of the new year the following questions: What does the Word say? Is there any prohibition there concerning what we are considering? What do the obvious displays of the providence of God speak to us? Is there an opening of the door and is it opening for us? What does the Holy Spirit say? Is there an inclination of the soul? Is there the attraction not born of self-interest or something to please self? It is not by one light but by three that our path is made sure: the Word of God, the providence of God and the Holy Spirit. When all three of these give us assurance, we may go forward without fear.

March into the new year with the assurance that God is with us and for us!



BOOK REVIEW

The Sacred Anointing: The Preaching of Dr. Martyn Lloyd-Jones. By Tony Sargent, Wheaton, IL. Crossways Books, 1994, 344 pp, \$13.99

A landmark study of the attending power of the Holy Spirit in the act of preaching upon one of twentieth century's godliest and most powerful expository preachers, Dr. Martyn Lloyd-Jones of London, is written by Tony Sargent, himself a preacher in one of the foremost pulpits in England. Sargent provides documented material and a well-written biography of Lloyd-Jones and his views on preaching. Sargent defines "unction or the sacred anointing," as the penetration and domination of the personality of the Spirit. It is the preacher gliding on eagle's wings, soaring high, swooping low, carrying and being carried along by a dynamic other than his own. The words are his but the facility with which they come compels him to realize that the source is beyond himself. Martyn Lloyd-Jones refers to this work of the Spirit as "the smile of God" upon the preacher. Readers will be pleasantly surprised at the openness in which Lloyd-Jones expresses his views on pneumatology and his experiences with "the divine afflatus which drives the preacher to the point where he has so surrendered himself to the dynamic of God's power that he is driven along as he proclaims his message" (p. 31). In a day when preaching is rapidly becoming a lost art form, hermeneutical and homiletical wisdom is desperately needed by preachers of today. Any Pentecostal preacher who desires to be fuel for the flame, and to preach not only in word, but also in power in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction, and to bring the Bible to life to his congregation will find this book most helpful in better understanding the anointing of the Spirit, sermon preparation, and vital information regarding the interpretation and relevancy of Scripture and the inspirational delivery of preaching material.

A MICROCOSM OF THE WORLD – WHO WILL REACH IT?

The world's population is exploding at a rate of 90 million per year. From creation to 1850 there were only 1 billion people in the world. From 1850-1930 it grew to 2 billion. From 1930-1960 it exploded to 3 billion. In the next 15 years from 1960-1975 it grew to 4 billion, and from 1975-1998 it exploded to 5.5 billion. Of all the people who have ever lived from the beginning of time, over half of them are alive right now.

In Acts 8, 9, and 10 there is a microcosm of the world found in 3 notable persons: an Ethiopian Eunuch, Saul of Tarsus, and Cornelius. The Eunuch comes from Africa; Saul is from the Middle East (Asia); and Cornelius is from Italy (Europe). Within a split second the world crosses before your eyes with three men from various geographies. With these varying geographies come varying cultures, however, they all bring to us 4 points of commonality.

They all had the same heartaches. As one reads these passages, he finds a descendent of Ham from Africa, of Shem from the Middle East, and of Japheth from Europe. All of Noah's sons are represented in these 3 men, but if you were to trace their roots properly, you would find that they, like you and me, must trace their roots back to Adam. (Romans 5:12 – "In Adam all die"). The heart of man is sinful, for he is born with an Adamic nature.

They all had the same hunger. When you find the Eunuch in Acts 8:27, he is on his way to Jerusalem "for to worship." Why? He is hungry for God although he has not met him yet. Saul of Tarsus seems much the same in chapter 9 as he has a direct conversation with Jesus himself. This philosopher falls to the ground in fear before God and asks: "Who are you Lord?" (Acts 9:5). Then in verse 6 his hunger progresses into a desire for obedience: "What wilt thou have me to do?" Outwardly he had demonstrated confidence, but inwardly, he was hungering for God. Finally, Cornelius in Acts 10 was found in the first two verses praying and seeking God. He is called a "devout" man, yet

he does not have a personal relationship with Christ.

They all needed the same help. As they saw their need, they needed help to find the answer. In Acts 8:29, God spoke to a deacon named Philip and sent him to witness to this Eunuch. In Acts 9, he sent an unknown layman named Ananias to meet Saul and direct him. In Acts 10, he spoke to an "ordained" clergy named Simon Peter and sent him to Cornelius' home to share the gospel. He called on Philip to be "Available" in that he was lifted out of a tremendous revival in Samaria and sent to one man in the desert. To Ananias he asked for "Expendability" as Saul had been given consent to kill many for their faith. To Peter he called for "Adaptability" as he was only used to preaching to Jews and was now called upon to invade a Gentile home.

They can all know the same hope. Jesus is the hope of the world. As Philip in Acts 8:35 "opened his mouth and preached unto him Jesus..." In Acts 9:5, Jesus himself preached to Saul and answered the question as to His identity with the following: "I am Jesus whom thou persecutest..."

Simon Peter preached to the entire household of Cornelius the following in Acts 10:38: "how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power..." All three were brought face to face with the answer to their hunger and the help for their heartache. His name is Jesus.

This same picture of cross-cultural evangelism and the melting of various cultures not only rests on the pages of Acts 8, 9 and 10 in your Bible, but I challenge you to pay close attention to the scope of what is happening around you and see if this melting pot is not also at your back door as well. If it is, it matters not whether you are ordained of God to preach like Peter, called to work in some capacity of leadership such as Philip the deacon, or merely an unknown "layman" like Ananias releasing ministry to those in need, the call of God is the same: "the harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few, pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth laborers into his harvest" Matthew 9:37-38.

Surround yourself with happy, peaceful thoughts. Listen to soothing, relaxing music. Do away with dark, dreary colors, and let the sun shine in. Decorate your home or work area with pictures of loved ones and beautiful scenery.

Make a date with a friend or loved one. Share conversation that allows release of day-to-day frustrations. Interest yourself in other people.

Laugh. A merry heart does good like a medicine! Laughing is a positive way to release emotions and is uplifting to both you and to others.



The Archives Committee for this Quadrennial has been appointed. They are, left to right, Superintendent Elwood Long, Rev. J. Doner Lee, Rev. Mrs. Blanche Pollard, Mrs. Jean Williams, Rev. Keith Rouse, Rev. Mrs. Daisy Morris, Mr. Phil Mooring, and Director Chris Thompson. The Committee had its first meeting of the quadrennial on November 10, 1998.

The Committee is proceeding with three special projects. The Octagon Tabernacle Restoration is moving ahead. Much work has been done – heating and air installation, pew refinishing, outside restoration, etc. Much is yet to be done –underpinning, storm windows, parking lot, etc. More than \$17,000 has been raised. Another \$3,000 to \$5,000 is needed.

With the addition of new offices in the Office Building, the old Evangelism office will become the Archives Center. Work will begin after the first of the year in setting up the center. Volunteers will be welcome.

The Committee has planned a second training to assist local historians in writing local church histories. The training will be February 27, at the Conference Training Center. Dr. James Goff and Dr. Don Woods will be speaking. All ministers, local historians, and those interested in local church history are invited.



LINES FROM LINDA

Have you had your vision checked lately? You may be missing some very special sights!

It seems that most of

us, sooner or later, have to resort to eyeglasses or contact lens to get the full benefit from our vision. I remember my first visit to the optometrist. I had noticed that road signs were getting a little fuzzy and that objects any distance away from me seemed blurred, so I decided to get my eyes checked. Sure enough, the result was a prescription for glasses. A few days later, the optician fitted me with this new accessory. I so well remember walking outside that day and looking around. I was amazed at what I saw! I could clearly see the individual leaves on the trees. The blades of grass stood out on the lawn. On my way home, the lettering on the signs along the roadside was crisp and clear.

Well, that was some years ago; and since then, I have had several new prescriptions as my vision has changed. As a matter of fact, now I have a variety of glasses which I use for various activities. My regular prescription is now what is called a progressive lens. These glasses, with the movement of my eye, allow me to look through the top of the lens for far vision, the middle for closer vision, and the bottom portion for very close vision. I also have a pair of reading glasses for desk work. Now that I am confined to glasses for driving, I have a pair of prescription sunglasses as well. I've even tried the contact lens, but they don't work for me.

I remember looking out our kitchen window one morning and noticing some object on the ground. Without my glasses, I couldn't determine what it was; but when I put my glasses on, it was clearly seen. I stood there and just thanked the Lord that He had provided me with a means of 20/20 vision even though my natural eyes could no longer see that well.

I was also reminded that morning that God has provided us with a means of 20/20 spiritual vision. As we look out today at the world around us, things seem so blurred, fuzzy and out of focus. However, as we look at them through the lens of God's Word, we can see clearly what is taking place. Our spiritual eyes can determine that the Bible is being fulfilled, and our sight is clear because of the lens of His Word.

Many times, in the natural, we fail to see the needs of people or conditions that exist right in our shadows. Yet, the Holy Spirit sharpens our vision and shows us clearly what we need to see up close.

There are even times when God puts the shades on us. Sometimes we might be prone to lose sight of the spiritual goals in our lives. The bright glow of the world would distract and nearly blind us to keep us from seeing our spiritual destination. The Lord will then provide for us a filter that will shade out the glitter and brightness that would cause us to lose our focus.

It is very important that we, as Christians, have a clear picture of God's plan. He has provided us with a means of 20/20 eyesight through His Word and communion with the Holy Spirit. It is important to keep check on our spiritual vision. If we don't, we may be missing some very important sights!!!!

EASY CHICKEN DIVAN

- 2 (10-ounce) packages frozen broccoli spears
- 1 fryer size chicken, cooked & sliced
- 2 (10-3/4 ounce) cans condensed cream of chicken soup
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1-1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
- 3/4 teaspoon curry powder
- 1/2 cup sharp cheddar cheese (grated)
- 3/4 cup stuffing mix
- 2 tablespoons margarine

Cook broccoli and drain. Arrange spears in baking dish. Place sliced chicken on top. Combine soup, mayonnaise, lemon juice and curry powder. Pour over top. Sprinkle with grated cheese and put stuffing mix on top. Dot with margarine. Bake at 400 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Serve hot.

You can complete this meal by cooking some rice in the chicken broth, serving garden peas and hot rolls. This is a quick and easy meal for family or guests.

This is a great time to come back home to the Lord, your first love, and renew at an even deeper and more seasoned level the most important relationship any of us will ever have in life. May we all love and serve Him 'til He returns.



Every year at Youth Camp we see boys and girls check each other out, then pair off – and many of them probably think they are in *love*. On a recent Sunday, the pastor of the church I visited dedicated a baby. I watched two very proud parents and one very tiny infant – and saw illustrated another

meaning of *love*. In a national publication I read the story of one man risking his life to save another from drowning — that is a touching picture of *love*. I heard on the news that a woman gave up a kidney as a transplant for her sister—*love* if I've ever seen it.

Love is a word that means many different things. Yet, there is one love that surpasses all others, one that is not only beyond our ability to express, but also beyond our ability to understand—the love of God. In Romans 5:7-8, Paul put it this way: "For scarcely for a righteous man will one die: yet peradventure for a good man some would even dare to die. But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us."

Any man worth his salt would die for his wife or children. Many of us would risk our lives or our health to benefit a brother, sister, or dear friend. But get this: God gave up His own Son, not for His friends, not for those who loved Him, but for those who hated Him, for His bitter enemies! And God gave His Son without any guarantees; each of us has the freedom to decide for ourselves whether or not we accept God's great salvation, purchased at so great a cost through His own Son.

God gave His own precious Son for the salvation of those who hated Him, without any assurances that the sacrifice would be accepted. That, my friends, is love in the extreme. It is my prayer for you that your life be filled with the love of God this February.

Convention '99

On Friday night and Saturday morning, January 8th and 9th, was our annual CEM Convention. We had excellent attendance, and the speakers were superb. On Friday night, nearly 200 teenagers were blessed by the ministry of Rev. Michael Jenkins of Kingsport, Tennessee, and were led in worship by Youth Pastor Kelly Clark and the youth praise band and singers from Gospel Tabernacle Church.



At the same time, workshops took place in the Training Center on the topics "Evangelizing Children" and "Ministering to Singles." There was a combined attendance of about 150 at these sessions.



Saturday morning saw two sessions entirely devoted to the teaching ministry of Dr. Elmer Towns, the man who is probably today's leading expert on Sunday School growth and development. Dr. Towns instructed over 200 people on "Leading the Sunday School into the 21st Century."

Superintendent's Page

The Apostle Paul challenged us with a never dying mandate recorded in I Corinthians 16:13, "...quit you like men. Don't give up! Don't give in! Don't jump ship! It seems to me he

is saying to us when times are difficult - don't resign. There are three ways I wish us to look at this word. First, we can simply quit: resign and give up. Second, we can become resigned to a given circumstance and have a defeatist attitude similar to that of David's associates in Psalm 11, "what can the righteous do?" Third we can resign! That is simply, re-enlist; sign up again for the

battle against all enemies of the Lord.

Rev. W. Eddie Morris, a beloved mentor of many of us served this fellowship as a clergyman from 1929 to 1991. His vast array of contributions to the Body of Christ included his twenty-four years of service as North Carolina Conference Superintendent. During that era the conference publication, The Evangel, was instituted. His article in March, 1961, thirty-eight years ago reinforces the subject I am addressing on this page. Brother Morris was a prime example of a man of God who would not quit.

If You Try and Don't Succeed, Try Again.

"I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." Phil. 4:13

In August, 1960, I stood on the banks of the Atlantic Ocean and watched what appeared to be a star move across the starlit sky in a matter of minutes. As this space balloon whizzed on its journey at the rate of 15,000 miles per hour I wondered about Echo I. What is the good of it? Who thought it out?

Later when I found out it bounced the radio signal back to the earth and the words: "This is President Eisenhower speaking..." were heard around the globe, I

had a great respect for it.

Who did it; was it by accident; was it easy? It seems at one time only one man had faith in the idea. That man was William J. O'Sullivan. It is said, "O'Sullivan heckled, harried and hornswoggled both those who worked for him and those he worked for. He went through channels, around channels, and even beyond channels to the White House itself, shepherding his crazy idea through the years of discouragement - until that triumphant August day when millions of people looking heavenward in Europe, Asia and North America saw Echo I curve gracefully from horizon to horizon."

As I stood on the Atlantic Beach on that night in August I saw the result of continued persistence. The will power to never say no. Seven failures, the sarcastic smile of men in authority, the impossibility of finding a

material or plastic that could be put directly in hot water and have a tensile strength of 15,000 pounds per square inch. A metal to cover, protecting it from radiation making it visible to the naked eye. All these and a thousand other people did not stop O'Sullivan. Popular Science Monthly carried the story as told by Don Murray. It was a "Do or die"

kind of thing. This man succeeded and I saw the result sailing smoothly across the elements on that memorable night in August.

I have told you this to call attention to my own need of that kind of "never quit" until the task is completed regardless of the failures.

Apparently some people cannot work if someone laughs at their ideas. They feel the world has to place its approval on what they do or there is no use to try, but in most instances men who have accomplished something have done it in spite of others and not because of them.

In God's work, let us continue with the persistence of O'Sullivan. Let not failure in the first or second instance stop or impede our progress. Keep pressing on. Ask, seek, work, believe; be persistent in what you believe to be right. As this man won, so will others if we don't know what the word "impossible" means and learn with the apostle Paul, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me."

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

1999 Year-End Totals

LINES FROM LINDA...

Yesterday I saw my first daffodil blossom of the year! It was a lovely reminder that Spring is on the way. It was also a lovely reminder of a dear former pastor's wife. You see, I saw this daffodil in the backyard of the building which was formerly the parsonage at Holly Hill Church. Mrs. Sallie Watson, who was the wife of Rev. Alvah Watson, planted hundreds of flower bulbs in that yard when they pastored our church in the late sixties and early seventies. Since that time the house has been remodeled into a fellowship hall. The grounds have been landscaped in a different manner. Yet, in spite of all the changes, the little daffodil bloomed.

I remember Mrs. Watson saying that she always liked to leave things more beautiful than she found them. I was reminded of that by the blossom. Although it was many years ago when Mrs. Watson planted that bulb, it's bloom brings back precious memories. It reminds me of a beautiful pastor's wife. She was a woman who was committed to her husband's anointing and call to the ministry. She didn't play the piano or sing specials or have a preaching ministry; yet she contributed greatly to his calling. She was faithfully at his side. She worshiped in her own quiet manner in every service. She loved the people in a genuine and caring way. I was a young mother at the time, and I shall never forget the many words of wisdom she shared with me... not in a preachy, authoritative manner, but in a warm and kind way.

The blossom also reminds me that, for all these years since the Watsons were at Holly Hill, the work of her hands has been lying in the bosom of the earth. Each year when the weather warms, the little bulb comes to life. First, the green foliage edges its way up through the soil and choking grass until it is just barely visible. Once it gets above ground, its stems reach for the sun and spiral upward. Soon a flower is opening its face, bright and yellow. It sends off a lovely aroma as it bends and sways with the wind. This flower is a reminder of the resurrection. The bulb has lain dormant in the darkness of the earth for months; but when the conditions are right, it springs forth to new life.

Both the Watsons have now gone to be with the Lord, but I shall never forget their impact on my life. When Brother Watson passed away, I mentioned to Mrs. Watson that I hoped she would save his sermon notes and not allow them to be destroyed. She remembered my interest in his notes; and prior to her death, she instructed her daughter to give me his notes if none of the children wanted them. As a result, I am the benefactor of a box full of notes. I treasure them, for I know they were born out of fasting and prayer and time spent in study and fellowship with the Lord.

Even though Brother and Sister Watson are no longer here with us, their influence is still a blessing. I often rummage through that box of notes. I remember some of the sermons he preached while he served as our pastor. I remember how I would often call him when I had a question regarding a Sunday school lesson which I was to teach, and he would lead me to scripture and share his wisdom of the word. Now I glean information from these notes which I find helpful in my own ministry

And with the flowering of the daffodil, I am reminded that life goes on. My prayer is that I, too, will be able to touch the world in such as way so as to leave it a more beautiful place.

THINK ON THESE THINGS...

Most people who serve in leadership roles will at times find themselves questioning the commitment of the people whom they serve. In times like these, it is easy to point the finger of blame and use the seemingly apathetic state of our people as an excuse for the lack of success.

Al Jolson was a popular musical comedy star of the twenties. Someone once asked him what he did to warm up an unresponsive audience. Jolson answered, "Whenever I go out before an audience and don't get the response I feel that I ought to get, I don't go back behind the scenes and say to myself, 'That audience is dead from the neck up — it's a bunch of wooden nutmegs.' No, instead I say to myself, 'Look here, Al, what is wrong with you tonight? The audience is all right, but you're all wrong."

How many of us have blamed a poor showing on our audience? Perhaps we could be like Al Jolson and take a different approach. He gave his best performances to his coldest and most unresponsive audiences; and the result was, before he finished his performance, the audience was applauding and begging for more. Wonder what our local Women's Ministries meetings would be like if each local director adopted Al Jolson's philosophy. There is a spiritual principle involved here: the more you give, the more you receive.

As leaders, are we satisfied to just barely do enough to get by? Are we caught in this trap of pointing the finger? Or are we willing to accept the challenge of motivating our people to action?

Yes, it takes extra effort! We cannot achieve excellence if we are not willing to do some self-assessing. We must examine our leadership style and make adjustments to accommodate the needs of our people. We must answer some hard questions and face the truth as to whether we are enrolling our people or blaming them.

Women's Ministries leadership is not designed to be a onewoman show. Unlike Al Jolson, who was a lone performer on the stage, our program is designed for teamwork. By utilizing the local WM Council in annual planning sessions and quarterly update meetings, local leadership will find many fresh and new ideas and approaches and will also get the buy-in of those people who assist in the leadership role.

It is easy for us to find excuses for mediocrity; however, God doesn't accept excuses. When we accept the role of leadership in God's kingdom, whether it be as a pastor, Sunday school teacher, WM director, or whatever, we are accountable for our performance. Before we point the finger at our charges, we must first point it in our own direction. We cannot declare our people "dead from the neck up" and give up on them. If we are to be effective leaders, we must look inward at our own attitudes and leadership style. We must determine to take responsibility, to be willing to accept new ideas and to utilize the gifts and talents of others. We must also look upward to God for His direction, guidance and empowerment and then move forward in faith following where He leads. Let us choose to put full energy into our performance. There is joy and true satisfaction in knowing that you have done your best!

A FAVORITE PERFUME...



As I was going through a store in the local mall, the fragrance of gardenia permeated the air and was so pleasant I was drawn to find the source. The display of Claire Burke products was full of new spring fragrances. A fragrance, either pleasant or offensive, gets our attention. In our daily walk of life, we will be either a "fragrant offering and sacrifice to God" (Ephesians 5:2, NIV) or an aroma that will keep others from coming to Christ... as dead flies might give perfume a bad smell. As we prepare to be a part of the bride of Christ, we must leave

the sweet aroma of the fragrance of Christ.

As others are in your presence, are they hoping you will soon go because of the fragrance of gossip, criticism, strife and selfishness which overwhelm them to the point they are at the brink of suffocation? Or do those around you want to draw closer to get a deeper breath of the fragrance you radiate?

Pleasing perfumes are a blend of ingredients, as is the fragrance of Christ. One ingredient is the aroma of FORGIVENESS. As found in Matthew 6:12, "forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors." We must be forgiven. Without forgiveness in our lives, our smell will be no different than an offensive odor that is covered up. The offensive smell will overcome, making its presence known.

Another ingredient is the aroma of TRUST. "While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal." (II Corinthians 4:18). The aroma of trust is necessary for those things we don't know or understand. We must come to the point in our lives that faith and trust in Christ will keep us smelling sweet, kind and precious in a world that is not always kind, lovely and of a sweet aroma.

LOVE is a definite ingredient of the fragrance of Christ, and we are to "love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul" (Luke 10:27). Without this love, the bonding of the aromas is missing. If the blending ingredient is absent, the fragrance of Christ appears as unidentifiable odors.

The aroma of JOY is likened to putting the fragrance into a container of exquisite beauty. Joy is not the absence of sorrow, but it is the presence of Christ. Joy is the marketing tool of this most holy, anointed and costly fragrance of Christ.

Breathe deeply! What is your aroma? Does it smell like Christ? Is the scent you encounter one of a fragrant offering and sacrifice to Christ?

Allow the Holy Spirit to wash and cleanse you and to drench you in a heavenly perfume.



Brother Gonzales is the new Inter-Cultural Coordinator for Evangelism USA. He works out of the Oklahoma City Resource Development Center.

JERUSALEM is the testimony of Michael and **MINISTRY**

What follows Jennifer Oliver and their work in Jerusalem in 1998. Michael

and Jennifer represented the N.C. Conference as shortterm workers. They hope to become full-term missionaries to Jerusalem at a later date. Praise the Lord for this dedicated couple. They are available to share their testimonies.

We are glad to report to the North Carolina Conference that Jennifer and I had an exciting trip to

Israel. We left for Israel on July 27, 1998. We arrived at Tel Aviv, Ben Gurion Airport on the 30th of July. After two days rest we proceeded to our work in the Coffee Shop.

The Coffee Shop, known as the Loaves and Fishes, is located inside the Jaffa Gate in the old city of Jerusalem. The International Pentecostal Holiness Church shares this ministry with the Christ Church. Christ Church is the oldest Protestant Church in the Middle East (consecrated 1849). cooperation with Christ Church in the Coffee Shop provides the Pentecostal Holiness Church with an open door

that most churches do not have. Beginning a ministry in Israel can be difficult. However, because Christ Church is already established and is older than the modern-day State of Israel itself, it enjoys privileges that newer churches do not have when someone wants to build a church from the ground up, such as, access to certain important visas, established presence in the country, familiarity with authorities and historical value to the country.

Jennifer and I worked hard in the Coffee Shop. We worked some 40 hours a week. We had opportunity to work alongside people from all over the world. The volunteers at the shop represented as many as 7

countries. The work was difficult and demanded patience and perseverance. However, we had chances to witness to all kinds of people, Jews, Arabs, and people from all nations of the earth.

Other than our service at the shop, which consisted of food preparation, waiting on customers and cleaning up, we also had ministry opportunities with Christ Church. Jennifer sang in the Praise and Worship team on Sunday nights. She also played the piano at two separate services at Christ Church in which the volunteers were in charge. The Lord blessed them with the opportunity to preach those two services. On Thursday nights we led a Bible Study; the topic was the book of Romans.

> In October, I was able to baptize four friends in the Jordan River. I thank the Lord for that opportunity and responsibility. We awoke early one Monday morning and traveled to Tiberias to the baptismal site on the Jordan River. It was a special time in the Lord for us all. We went throughout the Galilee area and spent the entire day in fellowship. Other than the baptismal, the highlight was climbing Mt. Tabor (believed by many to be the site of the transfiguration of Jesus.)

Israel is a beautiful and precious country, it is also a beautiful and

precious people. Today more and more Jews are coming to the saving knowledge of Jesus. (More in the last ten years than in the previous fifty.) I continue to pray for our brothers who are still held by blinders, that our Father in Heaven in time will roll back the veil and let Yeshua the Messiah be seen by his own.

I am grateful that the Lord called us to such a ministry. Jennifer and I hope some day to return to Israel. We are expecting a baby in July. In the mean time we will continue working on our credentials, with hopes to share our experiences with others. I do hope that the North Carolina Conference will pray for the peace of Jerusalem.

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

Superintendent's Page

We eagerly grasp the Vision for the future the Lord has in store for the International Pentecostal Holiness Church. Simultaneously we need to keep in mind where we came from.

◆ Joseph Hillary King chosen as general overseer of Fire-Baptized Holiness Association.

◆ Ms. Emma DeFriese served as principal of the Fire-Baptized Holiness Association School of the Prophets in Beniah, TN, when it opened in 1900.

1901 ♦ Word "Pentecostal" eliminated from name "Pentecostal Holiness"

◆ Students in Topeka, KS, baptized in the Holy Spirit and speak in tongues.

◆ *The Holiness Advocate* in Clinton, NC, had a successful run from 1901 to 1908, the handiwork of A. B. Crumpler. Name changed from Fire-Baptized Holiness Association to Fire-Baptized Holiness Church (FBH).

- 1902 ◆ G. F. Taylor led the Bethel Holiness School in Rose Hill, NC, from 1903 until 1907 when he left to head up the Falcon Holiness School (1907-1916) which had started in 1902.
- 1906 ◆ Azusa Street Revival began under leadership of W. J. Seymour; G. B. Cashwell filled with Holy Spirit.
 - In 1906, the Emmanuel's Bible School was established in Beulah, Oklahoma, where Daniel Awrey would serve as principal.
- 1907◆ Revival in Dunn, NC, led by G.B. Cashwell, results in FBH and PHC accepting Pentecost.
 - ◆ In October of 1907, G. B. Cashwell published the first issue of *The Bridegroom's Messenger* out of Atlanta, which he edited for one year before resigning to concentrate fully on his evangelistic efforts.
 - ◆ Crumpler resists the Pentecostal experience; attacks A. H. Butler in his publication.
 - ◆ J. H. King, General Overseer of the FBHC, sought for and received the Pentecostal baptism and spoke with other tongues on February 15.

The following is an abbreviated timeline of historic events that have shaped the development of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church over the past 130 years. You can access this material and much more on the Internet. 1867 National Holiness Association formed in Vineland, NJ. 1879 Iowa Holiness Association formed.

LINES FROM LINDA . . .

Don't you just love springtime? I do! When the grass turns green and the trees leaf out, that which has seemed dead springs forth in new life.

One of my springtime favorites is the butterfly. Some poets have described butterflies as "winged flowers" and "flying gems." Their movement is more graceful than that of a ballet dancer. Their colors are as beautiful as the rainbow. Scientists believe that there are approximately 90,000 different kinds of butterflies and things new. moths, making them the second largest order in the Revelation 21:5 animal kingdom.

The butterfly is an interesting creature. Every butterfly goes through four stages in its life. During each stage, its appearance is different and it leads a completely different kind of life. It begins as an egg which is laid by the female. In a few days, a larva (caterpillar) begins to form from the egg. The caterpillar spends its life eating and growing. It eats its own eggshell and then advances to leaves and such until it is fully grown. Then it finds a place to turn into a pupa, its next stage of life. It spins a sticky liquid thread which dries and attaches itself to a solid object such as a twig or stick. The pupa slips out of its skin and deposits itself onto the silk button it has spun and attaches there. A hard shell forms over it. The pupa does not eat and is inactive. Inside the shell a great change takes place. The structures of the caterpillar change to those of the butterfly. When the process is completed, the butterfly pushes its legs out of the shell and pulls the rest of its body free. After a few minutes of tightening muscles and pumping air and blood through its body and wings, the adult butterfly is ready to fly. This changing process is called metamorphosis.

It is interesting to me that in its caterpillar stage, this insect is very harmful. The caterpillar destroys millions of dollars worth of crops every year. Cabbage, alfalfa, beans, cotton, fruit and many other plants are destroyed by this culprit. In the pupa stage, it idles in darkness and is useless. Yet, in the butterfly stage it becomes very useful and is necessary to the balance of nature. Many flowers must have pollen from other blossoms to produce fruit and seeds, and butterflies carry pollen from flower to flower to facilitate this.

There is an analogy here which relates to the human race. We are born in sin with the Adamic nature in us. There is nothing we can do to prevent this. If we continue to live in that state, we can be very harmful. In the darkness of sin, we are useless to the building of God's kingdom. It takes a real change, a spiritual metamorphosis, for us to become a thing of beauty and a contributor in producing spiritual fruit. The transformation that takes place in our lives does not come from within us. It has been provided for us through the blood of Jesus which was shed on Calvary. Though we find ourselves in the darkness of the cocoon of sin, our Creator provides a means of bringing us to the Light.

So, I love it when the butterflies appear in the springtime. I enjoy their beauty and appreciate their purpose for being. However, what intrigues me most about them is where they have been. I am reminded that, no matter how harmful or useless we might have been, there is hope. The Light of Jesus makes provision for us to emerge from the darkness of sin as creatures of beauty and usefulness, with the ability to share that lifegiving message and produce spiritual fruit.

Springtime and butterflies...Thank you, Lord, for these lovely reminders.

A MEMORIAL TRIBUTE...



Faye Viverette

"To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven: A time to be born, and a time to die...." (Ecclesiastes 3:1 & 2a)

In the past few weeks, I have lived in the strong awareness of this portion of scripture. I have experienced the loss of a very dear friend and co-worker, Faye Viverette, whose unexpected death on February 19 came as a great shock.

I was asked by Faye's family to participate in her funeral service. Following is what I shared with the family and friends who attended.

"When I think of Faye Viverette many pleasant descriptors come to mind. In fact, I could just go down the alphabet & describe her. Faye was Able – a very capable person with a willingness to work. She was Beautiful - a deep inner beauty that far exceeds the outer markings of the flesh. Faye was Compassionate - a woman with a caring spirit, who took action to meet the needs of others. She was Dedicated & Dependable - one who was committed and on whom you could count to carry through her assignment. Efficient and Effective describe Faye, for she certainly knew how to get the most from resources at hand, and she knew how to get results. Faye was Fun...I'll never forget the humorous moments we had together...sharing stories and giggles during late night work sessions getting ready for conventions, etc.

There really isn't time to go through the entire alphabet here today...but the most descriptive word that comes to my mind when I think of Faye Viverette is FAITHFUL. I believe this word well describes her. I am reminded of the words of Jesus in the Olivet Discourse in Matthew 24 when He was inciting his followers to watch for His coming. He challenged them to keep the watch, for they did not know when the Lord would come. He said, "Be ready"...it will be in an unexpected hour. He went on to ask a question: "Who is the faithful and wise servant?" Then He answered His own question: "Blessed is that servant who is doing the work assigned to them when the lord of the house comes." This is a picture of Faye Viverette.

Several years ago, we were in need of a Women's Ministries District Director for the Rocky Mount District. At the district conference, I asked for a volunteer to assist me in passing out materials and receiving Feast of Ingathering offerings. Immediately Faye arose to do so. I did not know her then, but I watched her move

among the women and noted her warmth and caring attitude. A few weeks later, after making some inquiries about Faye, I called to ask her if she would be interested in working with us as a district director. She agreed to pray about it and call me back, which she did in a few days. Her answer was that she felt this was a way the Lord could use her. From that time on, Faye worked diligently to promote Women's Ministries. She visited nearly every church in the district. She made phone calls, sent newsletters, helped with conference-wide events, and helped with preparing for conference-wide events, and conventions – everything from stuffing packets to washing toilets. She proved loyal to her assignment, no matter whether great or small.

She told me several times what a blessing her assignment had been to her. She shared that there were times in her life when she felt like no one believed in her, yet this assignment had confirmed to her that God wanted to use her. Isn't that just like the Lord? When we give our best, we will be blessed!

Although we are shocked at the timing of Faye's passing, isn't that just what Jesus said to his followers?

Faye didn't know the Lord of the House was coming for her this soon. She was making plans for the future. But the beauty of this account is that Faye had not forsaken what the Lord had called her to do.

She was found faithful.

I believe Jesus' words in Matthew 25:21 bring us to where Faye is today. "Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." Somehow I can picture Faye today standing as close to Jesus as she can get just waiting for an opportunity to volunteer to help in some way. She was faithful here in the few things that her physical body permitted her to do; but in her spiritual body in Heaven, Faye will be a ruler over many things.

Today Faye is remembered in love, and our hearts are forever touched by her journey through our lives."

I hope this communication finds you and yours enjoying the blessings of God. At Easter time we need to be sure and focus on things beyond chocolate bunnies, colored eggs, and new clothes.

Not that I have anything **against** those things – especially anything made of chocolate! – but Easter is so much more. I was recently reminded of the true meaning of Easter, of the suffering, death, and resurrection of our Lord, by a piece of broken bread.

Last November I joined 100 or so

other pilgrims in the old Octagon Tabernacle for an early communion service. When the elements were distributed I took a small piece of light bread

from the silver tray.

As the prayer of prayed, I opened one eye – don't ask realized that my had broken. Most of the pew in front of me and I was left with only a tiny scrap pinched between my fingers.

No big deal, I reasoned; a tiny piece would serve just as well as a whole loaf as a symbol of the Body of the Lord – and I *knew* I didn't want to eat the part that had fallen onto that old pew. It probably wasn't clean. It had been contaminated with who-knows-what. It was certainly not suitable for the element of communion! But something in me was not satisfied with that line of reasoning.

As the man prayed on, I wrestled with myself. Should I make do with the tiny, relatively unsullied bit I had left, or should I pick up the fallen piece?

As his prayer drew to a close, I had a revelation – both about my piece of communion bread and about the Christian life in general. We tend to want our Christianity saranwrapped, kept from all contact with the "real world." We want our crosses made of gold, our pictures of the crucifixion sanitized, and our visions of Jesus glorified.

will probably let the it falls, but that had to pick it up.

What better symbol of the dirty, broken body of our Lord than a piece of dirty, broken bread? After all, it was for **me** that He became broken and dirty; it was **my** dirt, it was **my** brokenness He endured. Because He became dirty, I could be made clean. Because He was broken, I could be made whole.

I took up the broken piece and reunited it with the scrap in my hand, and, with other pilgrims, I ate. It was one of the most blessed communions I have ever experienced. As I ate that piece of "fallen bread," I remembered a Savior who reached down to lift up a fallen man, and I gave thanks for His love and His sacrifice.

Even as you enjoy the blessings of friends and family this Easter, be careful not to forget the passion of Our Lord. He is the "reason for the season" at Easter, too. The glorious truth is that the blood and gore and dirt and suffering of Calvary was not the end of the story! The fact is, HE LIVES - JESUS LIVES TODAY! We celebrate His life and we remember His death because He lives, and gives life eternal to all who will receive Him. Celebrate Jesus this Easter! Hallelujah! Christ Arose!



7 WAYS TO RATE YOUR CHURCH

Your congregation's spiritual environment can be tested.

Money magazine annually rates the 300 best places in America to live. The ratings are based on climate, affordability, amenities, crime rate, public transportation, medical care, and other factors.

A similar approach has been taken with churches. Several major metropolitan newspapers regularly review churches. A religion writer makes an unannounced Sunday visit and analyzes everything from the sign on the outside to the sermon on the inside. Like restaurant and theater reviewers, some writers even use ratings, from one star (poor) to five stars (excellent).

Before protesting the impropriety of such ratings, reread Revelation 1-3 and recall the biblical reviews of the seven churches of Asia Minor.

Most people rate church atmosphere within the first 15 minutes of their first visit. They may not be able to fully explain how they reached their conclusions, but here's what they're likely looking for:

1. Sensing the presence of God

People expect God to come to church. I wish I could define what exactly people are looking for. I can't. I guess it's like beauty - you know it when you see it even though you can't put it in words.

In Steve Macchia's book *Becoming a Healthy Church*, he tells the story of a pizza delivery person walking into the new ministry center of Community Covenant Church in Rehoboth, Massachusetts. Ten feet into the building, he stopped and asked, "What's going on here? What's this presence?"

Just as people can sense the presence of evil, they can sense the presence of God. For some who have never before experienced God, this single characteristic may determine their choice of church. Experiencing the supernatural is such a high priority in today's culture that it's importance dwarfs everything else in rating a church's atmosphere.

2. Other-centered

Some churches are self-centered. Some are otherscentered. It's not hard to tell the difference.

A friend recently entered a church lobby on a Sunday morning and walked straight into a donut-and-coffee hour. The people were talking and laughing and having a good time. They liked their church, but they never noticed her. After a few minutes of uncomfortable invisibility, she proceeded to the worship center where she sat in a pew alone for ten minutes. Finally an older lady sat and talked with her. The older lady also was new.

By contrast, an others-centered church is immediately interested in new people, what they need, and how the church can help. Such churches have a customized approach that changes with every person. The others-centered church talks little about its programs or its people unless that is truly helpful to the newcomer.

When our son was looking for a church in southern California, someone at one church told him, "You really should check out X Church across town with a singles ministry that would fit you better than anything we

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have to offer."

I was impressed. I found that church attractive -truly others-centered.

3. Understandable terminology

Healthy churches tend to speak in terms everyone can understand. They make an effort to translate religious terminology into everyday language rather than to repeat clichés and jargon that constantly remind insiders they are insiders.

An insider knows that a revival is a series of weekday and weekend religious services, but an outsider might never guess. "Passing the peace" is a common part of many liturgies but sounds a lot like asking for more pizza at the dinner table. "The ushers will wait on us for the offering" could mean that we aren't going to let anyone out until we all put something in. The most alienating lingo is abbreviations BYO may mean "Baptist Youth Organization" to church members but "Bring Your Own" beverages (or booze) to everyone else.

Blessed are those churches where everyone can understand what is being communicated!

4. People who look like me

As soon as most of us enter a room, we look around to see what everyone looks like. Our level of comfort can be high or low depending on how quickly we find someone else who looks like us. In a room full of women, a man thinks, *I'm in the wrong place*. In a church where all the people up front are men, women wonder if they are welcome. In a gathering where everyone is young and casually dressed, the older person in a business suit feels out of place. When everyone else is white, the person of color notices.

That can be hard to change. If everyone in the church is old, younger people are less likely to come. The church that wants to be integrated may have a challenge getting started. Yet, it is amazing how even the smallest symbols can make an impact. Seeing one person who looks and dresses "like me" up on the platform or ushering or pictured in church publicity can communicate an open and inviting atmosphere.

5. Healthy problem handling

You can often tell more about a church by the way it handles problems than by the way it handles success. This makes for an easy measure because every church has problems.

What happens when the sound system emits a squeal or drops into embarrassing silence? How does

the preacher respond to the howling two-year-old? Do nursery workers apologize or become defensive when they can't find your baby's diaper bag? When the church is running behind budget, is that a denunciation for the under-giving or a challenge to prayer and generosity?

What makes a healthy church is not the absence of problems. It's how problems are handled.

6. Accessibility

Every Saturday the *Minneapolis Star Tribune* reviews a local church, and every review evaluates whether the church building is handicap accessible and whether there is adequate parking.

However, wheelchair ramps and parking stalls are only the beginning of accessibility. Is there clear and easy access to getting questions answered, meeting new people, talking to church leaders, joining the membership, discovering opportunities for spiritual growth, becoming part of a small group, resolving complaints, and signing up to serve? High ratings go to churches that are "barrier free" in every sense of the term.

At our church, every attender is invited to complete an information card at every service. There are blocks to check areas of interest. Each week many people write questions, comments, and criticisms on the back of their cards. By Monday morning all of the cards are sorted and assigned for personalized follow-up. It is part of our commitment to be accessible in every possible way.

7. Sense of expectancy

Listen to hallway conversation about the church, and you can decide if the primary verb tense is past, present, or future. Most healthy churches are hopeful churches. They are permeated with high expectations of God's blessing for the future.

The majority of people who come to church feel beaten up Monday through Saturday; they are not looking for another beating on Sunday. They come to church for healing and hope. They want to hear the good news of Jesus Christ. They want to be told that God is there, God has not forgotten them, and God will bless them in the future. The church that truly believes and says that "because of Jesus Christ the best is yet to come" - that is the church that breathes spiritually healthy air.

BOOK REVIEW

The Journey Isn't Over: The Pilgrim Psalms for Life's Challenges and Joy By Walter C. Kaiser Jr. Grand Rapids: Baker Book House, 1993. 160 pp. \$8.99.

A Devotional commentary that will serve as an excellent source for Wednesday or Sunday evenings' presentations designed to exhort and encourage believers as they travel through this life. Kaiser uses the Psalms of Ascent [Psalms 120-134] as the basis of this study. These songs were sung by the Jewish pilgrims during their three pilgrimages to Jerusalem as they gathered to worship God in the feast. A wide range of topics are offered that include a weariness of the pagan environment, grace to bear ridicule and contempt, a cry for forgiveness from the presence of God, and reflections on the great things God has done. Questions for thought and discussion are presented at the end of each Psalm. For those who feel life is one long and wearisome battle with no apparent end in sight, this book offers helpful suggestions on how to handle life's difficulties and keep a song in your heart for God.

Deliver Us From Evil: Restoring the Soul in a Disintegrating Culture. By Rami Zacharias. Dallas: Word Publishing, 1996. 234 pp. \$19.99

Although God created the Cosmos to be a beautiful presentation of His Divine creative power, depraved humanity has succeeded in tainting His world. Man left to himself separated from God, is on a collision course to certain destruction. Zacharias, one of America's foremost critical thinkers, unmasks and explains the three "explosive theories and devastating ideas," secularization that has led us to a loss of shame, generating evil even against those we love, pluralization that has led us to a loss of meaning, generating evil against faith; he offers a very simple but powerful solution. Let's return to true truth as presented in the infallible and reliable Word of God. He makes the claim that the Bible is the only resource that can give coherence in our communities, without which, this evil, alienated world will fall apart. A must read for any serious Christian.

Ed Cole's Advice for Men's Meetings

After 40-plus years of ministering to men, Edwin Louis Cole has boiled down a few principles for leading a men's group:

- 1. **First, work on yourself.** "Leaders must talk to God about their group before they talk to their group about God." Work like it's all up to you: pray like it's all up to God.
- 2. **Be consistent.** "In any new avenue in ministry, the only 'trick' is consistency. Men won't commit to a moving target once they know you're committed, they will grow committed, too."
- 3. **Be loyal.** "Men naturally follow a leader whom they believe will take a bullet for them. Your constant concern, fairness, encouragement, and 'being there' will eventually win them."
- 4. **Stand firm.** Not everyone will agree with you all the time. Listen and learn from the disagreements of members, but don't sweat the constant criticism from the few stone-throwers."

HOME MISSIONS SUNDAY — MAY 23

On Sunday, May 23 the N.C. Conference will celebrate Home Missions Sunday. The purpose of this special emphasis as promoted by the N.C. Evangelism Ministries will be to encourage outreach among the local churches and to further church expansion. This is primarily a prayer emphasis. Things happen when people pray! For the last three years this prayer emphasis has focused on Hispanic outreach. This year is no exception. There is still a such a critical need for outreach to the Hispanics of Eastern North Carolina. There are presently nineteen Hispanic preaching points within the Conference. Praise the Lord for this number, but many more are needed.

A few days ago John Parker and I visited with a new Hispanic pastor who is considering uniting with us. He is a young man with a wife and two children. He is called of God, but with no training and no credentials. He has built a church of 80 plus. He and his people worshiped in a storefront in one of our small towns. They were asked to leave because of parking and the other merchants. They then used a tent outside of town. They were told they could not worship in a tent. He was told he would be arrested if he did not cease immediately. They then moved to an old building outside of town (literally falling down) at a high rate of rent. These people need us and we need them. Lord you must help us to reach them!

We must pray and we must reach the Hispanics. The primary way is to start a new church for them. The reason being - the language barrier. This, however, does not mean a separate building. We have some beautiful and spacious buildings across Eastern North Carolina. The Lord has blessed us! This present generation at times is riding on the backs of our parents and grandparents. We are blessed because of our forefathers' sacrificial labors. May we be willing to open our hearts to the future as did our ancestors.

We certainly could use some finances in this area, but the primary need is prayer. We need a positive attitude of outreach and an attitude of generosity in opening our buildings to these men and women. On this special day it is requested that every church, every minister, and every church member pray for Home Missions.

I was grieved a few days ago to read this statement from a Hispanic pastor in a local paper. "We're good enough to do their work, but we're not good enough to go into their churches to share the Word," said a bitter J. T. Mercado, pastor of the Latino Baptist Mission in Coats. "At our last mission, they asked us to leave, they said, 'We don't want no more Hispanics stinking up our pews." Thank the Lord, this is not true for most of the churches. But there is much yet to be done.

SIGHTS AND SOUNDS OF ROMANIA

- With sweater drawn around her, an old woman, head covered with a kerchief, lowers a bucket into the well in her small dirt yard.
- A father, mother and two children ride in a horse-drawn wagon filled with hay, which extends over the sides and covers half of the two-lane street.
- A woman sits on the stone steps of her small house, dipping a freshly killed chicken in hot water as she plucks the feathers.
- A group of teenage girls in jeans, brightly colored jackets, and high platform shoes, giggle as they wait on the corner for the bus.
- Wagons everywhere wagons of bagged potatoes, sticks, manure, people, dirt, hay...
- Clusters of Christians walk by lantern light to church because the village has no electricity right now.

- Walking between two horses, one man leads them as another man with a hand plow follows behind, working the field.
- A little boy, with hoe bigger than himself, works with his mother in freshly loosened soil in their small garden.
- As we stop in traffic, a five- or six-year-old girl mashes her nose against the car window, hand extended, hoping for money.
- In the early morning, wagon loads of shiny milk cans make their rounds in the village, stopping by homes to sell fresh milk.
- An old woman stands high atop a haystack pitchforking hay, as her equally old husband pitches hay from an adjoining haystack.
- We are greeted by the cold, chapped handshakes of ruddyfaced Christians who have walked to the village church in very cold temperatures, yet their hearts are warm with the love of Jesus.
- While the day is still young, a woman sweeps the dirt before her little house with a short broom made of unruly tree limbs.
- The humble mother in the home where we had a service takes a hand-made scarf from her small table and presents it to us, "so you will remember us."
- Victoria, a weathered, old saint, interrupts the service with a request for prayer because her cellar is filled with water, her foodstuff ruined.
- We awake to the sound of thick slices of bread being sawed off a large crusty loaf, to be served with cheese, butter, and possibly a piece of meat.
- A seven- or eight-year-old worships, repeating, "Ameen Jesus, Ameen Jesus."
- The morning air is broken by the sounds of the sheep as they are led by the shepherd over the hillsides.
- Clip-clop, clip-clop is an everyday sound as the horses pull the loaded wagons in a typical day's work.
- "The family is important," a young mother says, as she smiles with her children around her.
- Guitars, violins, accordions, skillfully played and offered in praise as the teenagers sing in the worship services which often last three hours or more.

These are the sights and sounds of Romania, an eastern European country just 10 years freed from communism. This is the country that God has laid on my heart, and finds its place in my prayers, and prompts tears when the thoughts of these precious people cross my mind. It was three years ago that God placed this desire in my heart to help the Romanian people.

Greenville First P.H. Church, which I pastor, caught the vision of reaching out and giving so that those in Romania might hear the Gospel. In October of 1996 I was privileged and honored to go to Romania with the World Missions Church

Planting Project. The small town of Ocna Mures was headquarters as I worked with Pastor Tibi Fozstu. While there on a Friday night I spoke in a small community building in the village of Ciste De Mures. It was that night the deacon from the orthodox church wanted to close the meeting down because a gypsy man wanted to attend. But it was also that night that this gypsy man found Jesus as his Savior. Today he still worships and serves Jesus and shares rich testimony to His grace. The following two nights' crusade services were held in the culture house of the village of Nosloc. In these services hours of music, testimony, and poems preceded the proclamation of Jesus' love. In the Sunday night service, 45 of the 60 in attendance came to know Jesus Christ. We committed Pastor Tibi and those who had been saved to the hand of Christ and the protection of the Holy Sprit as we returned to America. Today, two-and-a-half years later, the church is moving forward. It has its own facilities just two miles from the culture house of Nosloc in the adjoining village of Copland.

Three weeks ago my wife Sandy and I were privileged and honored to visit them and encourage their hearts in the Lord. While the service was conducted by oil lamp because the electricity was out in the village, the presence of God was real and strong as we worshiped together and as we ministered to those who had special needs. On the following day my wife and I traveled to the northeast corner of Romania to the town of Botosani to work with Pastor Liviu Avasiloai. We were able to minister on Friday evening and Sunday morning in his home church to a group of precious Christians. On Saturday and Sunday evenings we went with him to the village of Virfu Cimpului. Here a new church is being planted and we were able to encourage 12 Christians who are meeting in the home of the vice-mayor of the village.

To visit Romania is to "step back in time." But their spiritual needs are the same as ours and can only be met by a risen Lord. Help us pray for these wonderful people in Romania, who have such hungry hearts for Jesus and who respond so readily when told of Jesus' love. Every pastor and church should prayerfully consider participating in this mission outreach. It has been a great blessing for Greenville First to be a part of what touches God's heart so deeply.

SPECIAL REPORT

The N.C. Conference Missions Homes are in need of some help. We began the World Evangelism Rallies with the Missions Homes' account \$400 in the red. The offering during the rallies will go to the support of the homes. The Conference has two World Missions Homes; the Mollie Culbreth Missions Home in Falcon and the Jackie Wilson Missions Home in Clinton. Funds in the account go for the total upkeep of the Culbreth Home and occasional utility cost (in between missionaries) of the Wilson Home. A minimum of \$2,500 is needed for general operating.

In addition to the general operating funds \$1,000 is needed at the Culbreth Home to build a storage building. \$2,000 to \$3,000 is needed to refurbish the kitchen cabinets.

Missionaries are able to live in the homes rent-free. They are required to pay their utility costs. This is such a great blessing to the missonaries.

Funds that go to the support of the homes are credited to World Missions giving. Funds may be sent to Falcon and labeled "Conference Missions Homes."

IN MEMORY OF MY MENTOR, MY FRIEND AND MY DAD



My dad preached the Word of our Lord, as an evangelist and pastor, in the North Carolina Pentecostal Holiness Church for over 49 years. He was forever firm in his belief, and flowing in his anointing, and proud to be who he was and what he was.

Some of you knew him by his given name, Everette. Others only as Brother Eatmon. But many more knew him as a friend. To me, he was everything that a father is supposed to be. He was my mentor, my teacher, my preacher and my best friend.

This past October, he confided to me the following: "When I can do no more for the Lord, and can no longer preach His Word, I want to go home." Although he is now with the Lord, his spirit lives on in all the many lives that he touched.

He left behind a large and loving family, his wife Grace, three sons and a daughter, and six grandchildren. He also left behind a very large extended family – everyone who ever heard him preach the Word.

Our conference and camp meetings will never be quite the same for me without his physical presence. But I draw great comfort and joy in the knowledge that while we praise the Lord here on earth, my dad is in His presence.

One of my dad's favorite gospel hymns was, "I'd Rather Have Jesus." On December 14, 1998, that hymn became a reality. The Great Deceiver, Satan, got no victory from my dad's death. My dad died in victory for the Lord. Every spiritual goal he had set, he accomplished through God's everlasting mercy. I can hear my dad now, saying "Make yourself ready, none of us know when we will leave this world. Jesus could at any time step over the crystal pavilion of Heaven and shout, 'Come, enter into the joy of the Lord!'

LINES FROM LINDA...

Summertime brings opportunities for many various activities, one of which is festival celebrations. In our little town of Vanceboro, we have the Strawberry Festival. In a neighboring town, Grifton, the Shad Festival is the big event. The Collard Festival in Ayden and the Blueberry Festival in Bridgeton are also days of fun and festivity in neighboring communities. One we especially enjoy each year, also, is the Croaker Festival in Oriental. At such happenings as these, there is a parade, lots of good food grafts and vendors

good food, crafts and vendors.

At several such festivals I have been intrigued by the work of a local potter. He not only sets up a craft booth from which to sell his handiwork; he also has his potter's wheel assembled and demonstrates how his products are made. I have found myself standing for extended periods of time just watching his every move. It is interesting to watch how he begins with a lump of ugly clay and transforms it into a beautiful work of art.

I have noted the patience and persistence he demonstrates as he works. As his foot moves the pedal to keep the wheel turning, his hands are busily shaping the clay into the form he visualizes as the end product. His eyes are fixed steadfastly on the piece of work in his hands. He gently smoothes the rough edges that form, causing them to disappear. If a piece does not meet his expectations, he reshapes and reworks it. It is quite an interesting process, to say the least.

I believe the potter, from the beginning, must be able to visualize a beautiful and interesting piece of artwork. Yet, he knows the end result is going to be determined by the way he handles the clay. He knows that he must keep the clay moist — but not so wet that its consistency is disturbed. He knows just when to move his fingers with a certain pressure to create the shape he desires. That is why he takes great care not to rush the process. Instead, he concentrates on his every move and with tender touches molds the clay slowly and carefully. Even though he uses the same procedures, every piece is slightly different with its own personality.

As I have watched this potter, I can't help but better understand Isaiah 64:8: "But now, O Lord, thou art our father; we are the clay, and thou our potter; and we all are the work of thy hand."

God is so patient with us. He knows how to touch us in just the right ways to mold us into beautiful vessels of honor unto Him. He saw us in our mother's wombs and knows our potentials, and He gently and lovingly shapes us each day. He has a way of smoothing out our rough places. Sometimes the pressure of His hand seems heavy, but it is not without purpose. The hardest places in our lives are often the times that

truly build our character. Yet, we will never be the perfected work of art He intends us to be until we are glorified unto Him. He continues to rework and reshape us through the daily workings of our lives. As we are yielded to him and give ourselves fully to the control of His hands, we are being molded in His likeness. What a great work of art!

It is fun to visit with the crowds and eat the good food. It is neat to examine the wares in the antique dealer's booth, study the artist's display, and admire the jeweler's showcase. 1 8-oz. carton whipped topping



- A. The candidate shall request the necessary application papers from the Conference office. This may be done by phone or letter.
- B. Application papers will be mailed to the candidate, who will promptly fill them out and return them to the Conference office.
- C. The Conference Superintendent may require a personal interview at his discretion.
- D. Upon receipt and approval of the candidate's application papers by the Conference Superintendent, the individual is put on the list of official ministerial candidates to receive Conference credentials.
- E. The candidate in the Conference Ministerial Training Program will then be given the toll-free number [1-800-541-1376] for LifeSprings Resources so that he/she may order the necessary books. College degree candidates will be notified as to the expected date when their credentials will be granted according to their academic status.

3 x 5 PRAYERS...



R.M. STEWART MEMORIAL LIBRARY

At many times in life, the Lord gives special unexpected blessings. Recently the Conference office received such a blessing. Some 12,000 to 14,000 ministerial books were entrusted to the N.C. Conference by the Rev. R. M. Stewart's family.

Rev. R. M. (Marshall) Stewart went to heaven in mid-February. Brother Stewart pastored in the Black Jack community near Greenville for a number of years. He was a dear friend to the Pentecostal Holiness Church. He has ministered in revivals across the Conference and has spoken several times at the Conference Christian Worker's Institute. He was a man loved and respected.



On Monday, May 3, several special individuals journeyed to the home of Sister Annie Laura Stewart to pick up the books. These were Rudolph Britt, Merrill Davis, Paul Edwards, Danny Harris, Danny Nelson, Nathan Thompson, and Chris Thompson. These men worked with Brother Stewart's two sons, Marshall and Chris, to load the books, which took most of the day. Some 137 U-Haul boxes were filled. It might have been done a little faster if the preachers had not stopped several times to look through some special "gem." No! The men did a great job!

Special thanks is offered to Brothers Bennie and Gordon Knox (Robersonville and Ahoskie) who furnished the two trucks to transport the books. Thank you Danny Harris and Paul Edwards for picking up the trucks and driving them. It is a great blessing when God's people work together using all available resources. The trucks were a life-saver.

The books were unloaded at the Conference office on Tuesday, May 4. What a job carrying 137 boxes (some boxes, two men to a box) upstairs. The work was done. God did bless. Thank you office men for advice and the helping hands.

Bookcases are now being built. The books are being entered



into the computer by intern Jonathan Wheeler. It is hoped the books will be in place by camp meeting (July 18-25). The library is being established in the upstairs at the Conference office.

The library will be available to any serious student of the Word. Brother Stewart was a student of the Word. Through the years he

built this massive ministerial library because of his love for the Word and his quest for biblical knowledge.

The library will be open during regular Conference office hours. The books are for in-house use only and are not available for checkout. It is hoped that some ministers will plan weekly to visit the library and perhaps stay over in the Conference facilities for a day or two. This is such an important addition for the Conference Training Center.

The Stewart family chose the Conference to be the steward of the collection for several reasons. They desired the books to remain in eastern North Carolina and they desired the books to have maximum exposure to ministers. They wanted the books to be available to all ministers, but especially pentecostal and holiness ministers. They desired the library to be kept intact and they felt led of the Lord to bring the books to Falcon.

Due to declining health in recent years, Brother Stewart was

unable to keep the records of his books upto-date. It is not known presently just how many books are in the collection. Several things are known, including the fact that there



are many priceless books, and the books are in excellent condition. Very few Christian schools have this many volumes and such quality in their libraries. God is at work.

Many of our churches are becoming 7-Star churches for missions by broadening their base for missions support. Many are getting very creative in their "missions ministry." The following is an article by one such church – the Baywood Church, Fayetteville. Congratulations are in order to Pastor Ron Cannon and Missions Director Melba Hughes for a job well done! May their number increase.

Baywood Missions on the Move!

The Baywood Pentecostal Holiness Church of Fayetteville is taking seriously the "Great Commission" of the Lord. Under the direction of Pastor Ron Cannon, and with its Missions Director, Melba Hughes, leading the way, the Baywood Church is on its way to a record-breaking year in missions GIVING and GOING.

Recently, Mrs. Hughes issued a challenge to the entire congregation to sponsor a child through People to People. In a matter of months the number of children sponsored grew from 2 to 20.

Baywood has also been used of the Lord to raise funds for the planting of a church in Kenya in 1998 and by the end of 1999 will have raised the funds for the planting of another church in Kenya, as well as one in Ethiopia. Several thousand dollars has been raised to plant the church and to build a building. In addition to the church planting, the church raised \$1,000 to help missionary Phillip List buy a tent (total cost \$50,000). They raised \$2,800 for benches in the tent.

In 1998, Baywood hosted a ministry student intern from the Philippines. Rolando L. Alip Jr., or "Jun-Jun" as he prefers to be called, arrived in North Carolina in January of 1998 and returned home in May of 1998. Since returning home, "Jun-Jun" has begun to pastor a church on his home island of Leyte. Since it is quite a distance from his house to church, in February of this year the congregation of Baywood generously gave enough funds for "Jun-Jun" to purchase a motorcycle.

Not only has the Lord blessed the members of the church with opportunities to GIVE, but they are also blessed to be able to GO. This July (7th - 18th), a team of seven from the Baywood Church will be traveling to Cebu, Philippines, to work with our missionaries there, L. J. & Peggy Wood. The funds for this trip are being raised through a variety of means, with the most successful being our monthly "MISSIONS MEALS." On the third Wednesday night of each month the team and the missions committee hosts a meal and invites the entire congregation on a freewill offering basis. This has proven to be a great time of fellowship as well as an effective way to raise funds.

This summer we will once again be challenging the congregation to give a day's wage in the "GO" Offering, and they are believing God for the best outpouring yet.

"All of the things that we are able to do for the cause of Christ and missions are only by the grace of God. The ways that we are being used to GIVE and GO just serve to prove that even in a small or medium-sized congregation, if priority is placed on things that God says are the most important, the resources and opportunities are endless."

From the Superintendent

One of the benefits of serving our Lord in His Church and in His world is the opportunity to meet many people and to form lifelong friendships.

I began to serve as Conference Missions Director in 1982 while pastoring one of the strong missions-supporting

churches of the North Carolina Conference, Shiloh [Wilson District]. This privilege opened new vistas of experience for Sylvia and me. This relationship with the Global Evangelism thrust of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church was greatly enhanced with my appointment to serve on the General Church World Missions Board for the periods 1985 - 1989 and reappointment to this arena of service for the current quadrennium, 1997-2001.

These opportunities have allowed me to minister in Haiti, Mexico, Costa Rica, Zimbabwe, Zambia, Kenya, South Africa and Canada. Sylvia and I have met and ministered with so many gracious missionaries and nationals that even if I could call all the names to memory at the moment, space in this article would not permit the listing of them.

As I begin this writing I am sitting beside Sylvia as we travel the Eurorail from Paris to Madrid. It is Saturday morning, July 10, 1999. This trip started Friday morning, July 2, with a flight from the USA to Rome, Italy. We were to fly immediately to the island country of Malta. Due to the unpredictability of travel plans we were diverted to Catania, Sicily, for several hours before continuing to Malta.

My, a welcome sight to behold! Missionary Linwood Berry, RMC for southern Europe, and Pastor Joe and Cristina Ajuis met us at the Malta Airport. Brother Joe serves the Word of Life Church in Malta and the Jesus First Pentecostal Holiness Center on the neighboring Maltese island of Gozo. Praise God for this young pastor and young churches who are making a steadily increasing impact in the area of Apostle Paul's deathdefeating miracle after the shipwreck of the vessel transporting he and 275 other people to Rome. I had the privilege of preaching at Word of Life in the town of Qormi and visiting Jesus First Pentecostal Holiness on Sunday. Jesus First is located in the capital city of Victoria. It was great to meet and worship with the Ajuis' three sons and people like Jackie [our chauffeur for Sunday morning], her daughter Victoria and husband, Lino, assistant chef at our hotel. I believe the long-awaited breakthrough for Pastor Ajuis and his congregations to reach the people of this extremely traditional Roman Catholic country is on the brink of happening.

By the way, Linn Berry is such an accommodating servant of the Lord. Our luggage didn't make it to Malta until Sunday afternoon. Linn loaned me his white shirt and tie. The shirt fit greatly but the tie had to be left behind; my neck is just too large. It was a little more comfortable without the tie anyway on this extremely hot island. I'm spoiled with the widespread availability of air conditioning back home.

Monday brought us to Rome where we were met by the OMC for Europe, Steve Cofer and his wife, Betsy. The Cofer's are a charming treasure the Lord has given this church. They became our very competent guides as we visited places like downtown Rome with its ancient points of interest like the Coliseum, Paul's Mamertine Prison, the Vatican and the famed Saint Peter's Basilica. In addition we took a drive to see the Leaning Tower of Pisa. This is a magnificent example of ingenious engineering.

Late Wednesday we boarded the Eurostar, for overnight sleeping accommodations on this fast traveling train. Actually we changed to a sleeper car at Milan and headed for Brussels, Belgium, where we have a budding affiliate church. We changed trains and were met in Braine L'Alleud [the Waterloo area] by one of the young ladies of the church, Alice and her beautiful white dog, Sam, in their Dodge Caravan. We enjoyed the visit to the monument honoring Napoleon near Waterloo and visiting sites in Brussels like the Grande Palace Market.

Late Thursday we arrived by car in Paris, France. I praise God for our church in this "city of the world." Among the sites we visited are the Eiffel Tower, the famous Louvre with its shops and perhaps one of the largest, if not the largest, museums on this earth. Friday ended with a picturesque boat ride down the Seine as we enjoyed points of interest like Notre Dame Cathedral.

Very early Saturday morning the Cofers took us to the Montpasse Station where we boarded the train for the border town of Irun where we changed trains to finish a long journey to Madrid, Spain. The terrain included marvelously beautiful mountains, miles and miles of wheat fields, grazing cattle and sheep, olive and apple orchards and lusciously green grape vineyards. We were met at Charmatrin Station in Madrid by our dear friend Linn Berry, who whisked us away to their lovely and very practical home in Pantejo [a small village outside Madrid]. Linn and Nancy are precious indeed. They hail from this conference where I first met them about 22-23 years ago at the Evangel Church. Their daughter, Sara, who is associated with Regent University in Virginia Beach, Virginia, were such gracious hosts. The Berrys really know how to make us welcome.

Sunday morning took us to church at Centro Cristiano in

PRESS RELEASE - IPHC Joins NAE Call to Churches to Pray and Fast

WHEATON, IL-The Evangelism and Home Missions Association of the National Association of Evangelicals (NAE) challenges NAE denominations and churches to pray and fast from September 21 to October 30, 1999. The 40-day initiative, "Called by My Name," encourages churches to fast and pray for personal growth, church renewal, national revival, and social transformation.

Designed as a lead-in to the Mission America Celebrate Jesus 2000 evangelism efforts in the fall of 1999 and the year 2000, the initiative has been in the planning stages since September 1996. Three things set it apart from other 40-day prayer and fasting initiatives. First, the NAE has put together a solid package of resources for participating churches: a book of 14 sermon ideas and suggestions to go along with the seven-week campaign; a book of seven dramas that enhance the messages; a personal spiritual journal; a

daily prayer calendar; posters; a day of prayer sign-up poster; and a booklet, How to Plan Forty Days of Prayer and Fasting. Second, it is being promoted as a one-time initiative. Third, while some individuals will fast for the full length, fasting on a smaller scale is emphasized so that no one will be intimidated and everyone can get involved.

It should also be noted that the resources are not datesensitive. While the "Called by My Name" initiative is planned for this fall, a church is welcome to use the materials whenever it feels led.

The IPHC General Superintendent's Office and Evangelism USA are co-sponsoring the 40-Day Call to Prayer and Fasting in conjunction with NAE. The "Called by My Name" resource packet has been mailed to every Pentecostal Holiness pastor in America. If you did not receive a packet, call EVUSA at 405-787-7110.

I enjoyed preaching to this vibrant congregation.

Sunday evening afforded us the joy of worshiping with the fast growing P. H. Congregation in Parla. The constituents here were mainly natives of Spain. Again, I had a good time delivering the message the Lord gave me from His Word. Both these churches are cell-based with many cell-related activities during the week. My, what a celebration gathering they have on Sunday.

Other locations are targeted to start churches. I can truly call Linwood and Nancy Berry the "David Livingstones" of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church in Spain. I praise God for this team. The Spanish Conference will be formed and organized on Friday and Saturday, July 16 and 17, as they meet in the Parla Church for this historical occasion. OMC Steve Cofer and RMS Linn Berry will set this conference in order. If my memory serves me correctly these are some statistics that will evolve from the first session of the Pentecostal Holiness Conference in Spain; nine people will receive Conference Minister's License, four will be granted Local Church Minister's License and one will be joining by

Disaster Relief Update - With the huge disaster that we have seen in Oklahoma and Kansas, this area needs to be re-looked. Each pastor was mailed a video on "Storm of Tears" which captured the devastation. (If your chapter has not seen this, let us know and we'll send you a tape.) Disasters are always... around the corner, and hurricane season in North Carolina is a warning. In the next few months the Disaster Recovery Manual will be published. It will contain guidance on setting up and training specialty teams for disaster relief. Your church can select from one of many areas to build a team, such as debris clearing, construction, roofing, dry wall, etc. This is a ministry area for your chapter to be involved!

LINES FROM LINDA...

ater is a precious commodity, yet we take it for granted. Recently in some areas of North Carolina there was no rain for weeks. The ground had become dry. Crops and gardens were beginning to wilt and give in to the heat and lack of water. Because of near-drought conditions, there was a ration of water use in some cities and counties.

We are so accustomed to the convenience of modern usage of water. We become thirsty; so we simply go to the faucet and, with little effort, turn the handle and the water freely flows to fill our cup or glass. Often we fill the glass full to only take a few swallows and pour the rest down the drain. We want to clean up, so we hop into the shower and leisurely allow the water to refresh and clean our bodies. If time allows, we may fill the bathtub full and sink down in the bubbles for a time of relaxation while we soak clean. We turn on the water hose to irrigate the lawn. We push a button on the washing machine to do our laundry. Washing dishes is as easy as pushing a button on the dishwasher.

Some use water for aesthetic effects. The ripple of a stream or a fountain in the backyard garden offers a soothing sound and a pleasing sight to satisfy our senses. The home swimming pool is no longer a rarity and offers pleasure and relaxation for those who enjoy swimming. Land along the waterfronts now has skyrocketed in price as it is being used for home sites.

I remember, as a little girl, water was not so convenient to us. We had a hand pump on the back porch. Daddy had built a shelf up around it and put an old sink under the mouth of the pump. Mind you, there was no plumbing, the water just went through the hole in the sink into a little short piece of pipe and out onto the ground below. Beside the pump was a jar that was always filled with water. You didn't use that water for any reason because it was reserved to prime the pump.

When we took a bath, Mama would pump a little

tub (we called it a foot tub) full of water. In the winter time, she would place the tub on the kerosene heater until it was warm, and then divide the water to each of us in a wash basin as we took turns bathing. In the kitchen, she kept a water bucket with a dipper in it to dip out water needed for cooking and cleaning the dishes, pots and pans. For a summer splash, we filled a washtub with water and waited for the sun to warm it. On wash day, we had to draw water from the well, which was just a few steps from the back door. We filled the washing machine and two large tubs. One tub was the bleach rinse and the other was the plain water rinse. When the clothes were all washed and hung on the clotheslines, we used the wash water to scrub the porches.

I heard my mother tell of her childhood when she and her brothers and sisters had to take buckets a long way down a path in the woods to a spring to fetch the water needed for use by their family.

Yes, we have come a long way. Modern conveniences place everything, including water, right at our fingertips and accessible with the greatest of ease. But as I think about this water situation, my thoughts are led to another kind of water. Jesus called it the WATER OF LIFE. You know. He offered it to the Samaritan woman at the well. He told her if she would drink of it, she would never thirst again. I am reminded that there has never been a scarcity of that water... and it is so accessible. It has great aesthetic value as it soothes our very souls. The pump never has to be primed for it flows freely from the River of Life. It cleanses us from the filth of sin and spiritually refreshes us. When we drink freely of the water Jesus offers, we do not thirst for the things of this world. And the beauty of His water is that it is not only good for this life but for all eternity as well.

Yes, water is a precious commodity. We can't live without it. Let's not take it for granted!

The day began as ladies gathered in the Cafeteria/Training Center Building. WM District Directors served as registrars and distributed packets to the ladies as they registered. 

The Preacher's Portrait. By John R.W. Stott. Grand Rapids: William B. Eerdmans Publishing, 1961. 124 pp.

Dynamite comes in small packages. Though brief and small in size, this little book can supply some needed insight to Christians whose ministries have lost their glow. Using five key words describing the Christian minister, a steward, a herald, a witness, a father and a servant, Stott with crystalline clarity explains the biblical role and responsibility of the preacher. The preacher is to be preoccupied with his message, what it is and how he delivers it, and with himself, his personal experience of what he is preaching, concern about his family and the people to whom he is ministering, and above all maintain a servant attitude reminding ourselves of the indispensable need for God's power in preaching. The goal of Christian ministry is not to be popular but to be powerful. That power comes from purity and humility. A must read!

The Anointing: Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow. By R.T. Kendall. Nashville: Thomas Nelson Publishers, 1999. 182 pp. \$9.99.

Many Christians struggle with the idea of needing to do more for Christ and the Kingdom and yet failing to find the resources, energy and intentional drive to fulfill the purposes of God in their lives. Kendall, in a very readable fashion, challenges believers to become men and women of today and tomorrow instead of the past. The key is the liberating and powerful anointing. Using the examples of King Saul, Samuel and King David as his premise, he shows the need for believers to examine their "anointing" as to whether they are upto-date in their flow of ministry. Far too often burnout in ministry occurs when the servant has moved outside his or her anointing. The author urges believers to identify their anointing in terms of spiritual gifts, accept that anointing and stay within its limitations. Ministers get into trouble when they are placed in areas of service in which they are not competent and adequately trained. Understanding God's anointing for your life can "stop you from looking over your shoulder at another's anointing," finding gratification in the work that God has made possible for you.

This book offers special insight for young ministers who have the anointing but not the platform. Martyn Lloyd Jones stated, "The worst thing that can happen to a man is to succeed before he is ready." One of the hardest lessons to learn for the minister is to wait. David early on was anointed to be King of Israel, but waited for his platform of service. Kendall stresses the importance of preparation for tomorrow's man or woman by patiently waiting, learning, praying, and staying open to the Holy Spirit. By all means possible, buy the book!

I would like to devote this entire page this month to the recent *Youth Missions Trip.* In a report filed by Rev. Charles Boyd, our Conference Youth Pastor and organizer of the trip, he wrote: "On June 27, 1999, eighty-seven eager Missionaries from 12 of our churches ventured forth to storm the nation's capital with the Gospel of Christ. The journey would require the teens of the NC Conference to be flexible and step outside their comfort zones.

"Our ministry opportunities were limitless in a city so torn apart by sin. Four days prior to our trip a single mother was gunned down in front of her home in a drive-by shooting. She died because she threw herself in front of her kids to protect them. She had no way of knowing that one week later we would set up an outreach on the very street where she was killed, and that several kids would give their hearts to Christ.

"We ministered with drama and with singing in several Salvation Army Day Camps and picked up trash in the roughest sections of D.C. We passed out more than 400 'Jesus' videos, conducted street evangelism, and ministered to people in a retirement home. We had several church services, including one in the middle of the projects. Over 350 people made commitments to Christ. Drug addicts, homeless people, and many others who had lost hope found the Truth and were set free! "To God be the glory, great things He hath done!"

As the following testimonies reveal, this trip had a lasting impact not only on our nation's capitol but also on the young

people who ministered there.

From *Natalie Hoffman*, Clinton PHC: "This past week...I realized what a small, simple world I live in compared to that of the people I came in contact with. I saw many small children that have already been through more than I probably will ever go through, and yet I let little petty problems ruin my life. I think the one thing I really learned is how blessed I am and how much I take for granted."

From Candace Pittman, Capital PHC: "When you ask a little girl or teenage boy what they want to pray about and they tell you they are worried that their families might get shot, you begin to realize how fortunate you are. My biggest worry might be what to wear tomorrow, and these kids don't even have shoes on their feet. From this trip I learned that during our most fearful and helpless times, God uses us the most. When we had a service in the Projects and we had fire crackers thrown at us, we became afraid and all I knew to do was worship God and pray hard. My scripture for this trip was, 'God has not given us a spirit of fear...'

From *Danny Colvin*, Clinton PHC: "The missions trip to Washington, DC, was perhaps the most awesome and important trip I have ever taken. I really hadn't known how blessed I am until I saw how people lived in the rougher parts of that city. Another thing I developed was patience. Before last week, I was impatient ... I barely had any self-control. Instead of getting furious with those who didn't agree with me, I learned to listen and keep my cool. I truly thank God for the opportunity to go on this trip."

Finally, from *Jenna Pittman*, Capital PHC, a poem.

As I reflect on Washington DC
And what this missions trip meant to me,
I see so many faces, all kinds, in so many places,
their deep hunger for God and His love –
We planted seeds with help from above.
"It's time to reap the harvest,"
from the largest to the smallest, the shortest to the tallest!
There's hurting souls all around us,
even your next door neighbor.
Oh! How deeply they need Jesus!
Even the hard to reach –
the ones who mocked us because we wanted to preach –
we wouldn't give up, neither did Jesus.

God protected and calmed our fears, He also dried all the tears.

Some of us were taken out of our comfort zones,
used by God in a powerful way –
We rejoiced through anointed praise and worship songs!

While on this trip I realized how thankful I should be For a roof over my head and parents that love me!

We often take for granted this "good life";

It's not like every day we fear that a family member might pull a knife...
or the next car that goes by could be a "drive-by..."

or that firecrackers being thrown

"This time it's not firecrackers"

– now as a statistic you're known!

It's sad but true: many lives we touched but some still don't have a clue... Washington, DC, will never be the same – We gave of ourselves and changed lives in Jesus' Name!

From the Superintendent

Called by My Name

is a worthy emphasis of prayer and fasting in which many International Pentecostal Holiness Churches are already

participating or making plans to participate. We are cooperating with the "Forty Days of Prayer and Fasting" emphasis, a ministry of the National Association of Evangelicals Evangelism and Home Missions Association. I lift the majority of the article from their pamphlet, "Called by My Name."

I quote from the current pamphlet, "Called by My Name:

Forty Days of Prayer and Fasting

As the 21st century spreads insistently across the horizon, the National Association of Evangelicals is calling thousands of churches and tens of thousands of believers to prepare themselves for spiritual leadership in the new millennium. God's Word challenges us to take up the mantle of spiritual leadership in 2 Chronicles 7:14: "...If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from theft wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land." God expects His people, those who are "Called by My Name" to lead the way to personal growth, church renewal and national revival. How? Through prayer and fasting.

Great things happen when God's people seek Him. The Bible is full of examples. Moses spent forty days alone with God on Mount Sinai to receive a vision for building a holy nation... Daniel came out of the lion's den with his life as a result of prayer and fasting...a widow named Anna spent her life in prayer and fasting that enabled her to become one of the first to recognize the Messiah... Jesus conquered temptations in the wilderness and set the course for His earthly ministry during forty days of prayer and fasting... Cornelius sought salvation for his household through prayer and fasting and became the first Gentile convert to Christianity. Then and now, God blesses spiritual leaders who seek Him through prayer and fasting.

Prayer is simply talking to God, listening to His Word and His Spirit as you do. Prayer does not change things, so much as it changes us – making us more open to God's will and ways. During the next forty days, give renewed daily attention to seeking God's mighty acts and blessings for yourself and others.

Fasting is the spiritual discipline of giving God priority over something else in your life for the privilege of spending more time with Him. Usually, it involves not eating for a certain period of time, such as one meal a day or one day out of a week. Persons who cannot fast for health reasons might choose to give up an hour of sleep, television or recreation instead. The main point is to commit yourself to an act of self-denial that frees time for spiritual purposes.

Fasting creates a mood of seriousness about prayer. It increases sensitivity to the Holy Spirit...strengthens our resolve to obey God...heightens our desire for His presence...purifies our motives...and reminds us to pray without ceasing.

Prayer and fasting are not tricks to make one more "religious." They are not tools for getting God's attention or manipulating His favors. They are means of yielding our lives to the Lord. They are ways to let go of our plans and desires so that we can take hold of His. They are opportunities to say to our Savior, "Nothing is more important to me than knowing You and putting You first in my life."

The prayer calendar will help you balance and deepen your personal devotions. Suggested Bible readings will motivate you for personal spiritual growth and help you to pray according to God's will. Daily prayer reminders will provide focal points for effective intercession. Add your own requests to these thoughts and boldly take your needs before God. May the next forty days be filled with deep delight as you prepare yourself for spiritual leadership in the new millennium.

Planning Your Daily Time With God

Only God's people have the capacity to enjoy fellowship with Him. But friendships take time–especially a friendship with God! That is why "Forty Days of Prayer and Fasting" is so important. It is an opportunity for you to experience a new level of intimacy with God and to sharpen spiritual leadership skills for use in your home, church and community. Here are some ideas for making the next "Forty Days" more meaningful.

- **1. Be determined.** Many interruptions and other priorities will seem more urgent than prayer at times. Treat your time alone with God as the most important appointment of your day.
- **2. Be deliberate.** Decide on a specific time and place to meet the Lord. Decide beforehand the exact mealtime(s) or activities you will deny yourself in order to use the time they would have taken for prayer instead. Mark the times you will fast during the next forty days on your calendar as a personal reminder.
- **3. Be disciplined.** Keep your thoughts from wandering by following an outline for your time with God. Use the ACTS prayer model, for example, spending a few minutes each in Adoration (telling God why you love Him), Confession (asking forgiveness for yourself and others and acknowledging ways you need the Lord), Thanksgiving (expressing praise and thanks to God), and Supplication (presenting requests to God).
- **4. Be detailed.** God invites us to "cast all our cares on Him." Keep this guide in your Bible as a prayer reminder. Make your own prayer diary or daily list of specific requests and answers. Start a journal or write individual requests on a set of index cards.

We must prepare our people, God's people, for spiritual leadership and spiritual warfare for the New Millennium. A good start in that preparation is a call to prayer and fasting.

A NEW WORK - BRUSSELS, BELGIUM

For at least four hundred years, Belgium has been subjected to spiritual darkness. Even when the flames of spiritual awakening were spreading all over Europe during the Great Reformation, the fire was snuffed out in Belgium as quickly as it had begun. Since that time, this tiny country in northwestern Europe has been ravished by

regimes of men who sought to rule the world.

Despite this, Belgium has risen to a position of influence on the European political and economic scenes. Often called the crossroads of Europe, its capital, Brussels, has been chosen as the capital of the European Union and serves as host for the headquarters of the North Atlantic Treat Organization (NATO). As nations from around the globe converge in this small city for some of the most important political and economic decisions made in our time, it is no wonder that Brussels has been targeted as a place of spiritual importance.

While there are only a few churches in Belgium, God has not passed over this part of the world. Hundreds of missionaries have come into the country and churches are being planted there to the praise of His glory! At the beginning of this year, the IPHC partnered with one of these new churches to bring the light of Christ to this

nation.

The church, Praise Center, was planted about three years ago and has grown to nearly 150 people in attendance. It is located in one of the most prestigious areas of the city and is surrounded by embassies, consulates, and diplomats from around the world. The irony is that God has given the church an incredible ministry to hundreds of political refugees who have poured into the country due to hardship in their own land.

The church also sponsors a Bible school where I had the privilege to teach for several months. This training center is a vital part of our efforts to equip our people for the work of the ministry. Dozens of students have matured and have been prepared for kingdom work there. Many have moved from spectators to participants, from the perimeter to the center of what God is doing. The fruit of their studies is evidenced in their increased participation and initiative in joining existing outreaches and designing new methods of reaching the lost especially suited to their own gifts.


Led by pastor Bert Phagan and his incredibly talented family, the church there is reflecting the life and light of Jesus to a spiritually darkened land. As He is glorified in that place, we are expecting the hearts of the Belgians to be turned back to God in abundant harvests of souls. Thousands of Christians all over the city have been involved in concerts of prayer asking God to tear down walls of division among the races, among ethnic groups, and among the churches and to send a new wave of His Spirit there. God is honoring those prayers and we are beginning to see His hand at work in new and exciting ways. The pastor is leading the church in his vision to reach 1,000 people with the Gospel before the year 2,000. To God be the glory!

I want to thank you who have helped me fulfill Jesus' great commandment. Without your help, I could not have been a part of the work there. Let's keep proclaiming His Word and keep reaping His harvest while we have the opportunity. I encourage you to keep "going into all the world" and if you are unable to go yourself, to keep sending into all the world as you have sent me and many others. By all means, keep praying over all the world so that together we can be about our Father's business until "the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea."

Special Note: Praise the Lord for Rev. Ryan Jackson. Ryan is a member of the N.C. Conference.

His hometown and church is in Saint Pauls (Pastor Ray Faircloth). He presently is in Masters School in England. This summer he served as S.O.W. worker in Brussels. He will be traveling each week across the channel to Brussels to work in the church. He will need travel funds. Grace: The Truth, Growth and Different Degrees. Morgan, Pennsylvania, 1997. By Christopher Love. 173 pp. \$24.95

Grace, although simple in concept, seems to be an illusive subject for many Christians. Do we truly understand grace and all of its ramifications? Love (1618-1651) was a prominent London minister, a Puritan, who was highly regarded by his peers. The book contains 15 sermons on grace using I Kings 14:13 as its premise. Full of doctrinal truths and practical applications, I believe it is one of the best books written on grace that I have ever read. You cheat yourself being deprived of the contents and the spirit of this publication. It will bless your life tremendously and speak to your heart. For example, Love stated, "A child of God may be tossed by reason of corruption and temptation in a troublesome sea, but that ship shall never be shipwrecked whereof Christ is the pilot, the Scriptures the compass, the promises the tacklings, hope the anchor, faith the cable, the Holy Spirit the winds, and holy affections the sails, which are filled thus with the gales of the Spirit." Happy reading!

Hope Again; When Life Hurts and Dreams Fade. Dallas, 1996. By Charles R. Swindoll. 283 pp.

Encouraging believers to take the long view of life, Swindoll in historical fashion presents the truths found in I Peter that are greatly needed in the present spiritual climate. Have you ever seen so many people hurting and agonizing with heart wrenching problems? The Devil seeks to hurl believers against the rocks of hopelessness. More than we want to admit, many live on the edge, existing from day to day, not knowing whether they can survive another crisis or temptation before throwing in the towel. The author offers helpful insights covering such subjects as failure, suffering, temptation, guilt, unfairness, marriage, immaturity, trials and culture. When life is at low ebb, the Lord Jesus will restore us and help us to look ahead towards a better and brighter day. We can gracefully endure trials, overcome temptations and life's disappointments, rebuild life after a failure, and find joy in all circumstances. A most profitable read!

Letter from Diane Bunn...

I thank the Lord for the NC Conference P.H. Church. It has blessed me many times in my life. I was saved when I was seven years old at the Friendship P.H. Church in Wilson, where my father, Rev. Emmett Earl Turner, was pastor.

I remember one particular service we had when Brother Tim B. Henry laid his hands on me and prayed for me and told my parents and me that the Lord had a work for me to do. All my life, I've tried to find out what it was the Lord had for me to do. I've always tried to do anything I was called on to do for the Lord. Each time a new opportunity would present itself, I would say to myself, "Lord, is this it?" It seemed that I would never know what that was.

Then on November 14, 1998, I was blessed to attend the Children's Prayer Conference at Falcon (presented by missionaries Elizabeth Rogers and Althea Meyer). I knew when I left Falcon that day, that I had found what the Lord wanted me to do. I came home and shared with my family and my church what the Lord had done for me that day. The next day, the Lord gave me the assurance of what He wanted me to do. Shining Lights

This is the time of year when many of our young people enter institutions of higher learning. Some attend Bible schools and seminaries, planning to enter some field of ministry. Others enroll in colleges and universities to prepare for a career in business, law, education, medicine, and so on. It is important that we realize that all these fields need *light*!

We in the church have tended to make a distinction between the secular and the sacred, assuming that what is termed **secular** employment is somehow less important to God than that which is termed **sacred**. Although God does call some to full-time labor in His field, we are **all** "called" of God - called to be disciples, called to be witnesses, called to be evangelists. All are **called** to let their light shine wherever they find themselves. Matthew 5 records that Jesus said, "You are the light of the world. A **city on a hill** cannot be hidden. Neither do people

light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone..." (NIV)

A **Christian** teacher is not just one who teaches in a Christian school; it is a **Christian** who teaches in **any** school. A **Christian** lawyer is not just one who defends churches from lawsuits; it is **any** lawyer who is a dedicated **Christian**. The designation

"Christian businessman" includes not only those who operate Christian bookstores or Church supply houses; it includes any Christian in any business. And so on. Paul, the beloved apostle, wrote in Colossians 3:23: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men." So, there are no "secular" occupations; we are to do everything we do "as working for the Lord, not for men."

"Letting your light shine" means more than just not being ashamed of your faith; it involves an element of risk. If others know you are a Christian, they may challenge you. They may question your beliefs. They may attack your faith, the very values by which you were raised. If you *hide* your faith, you are never called upon to *defend* your faith. If you *conceal* your faith, you never have to *fight* for it.

A city on a hill was, in a sense, a challenge to the enemy. Christians ought to be out there in every field of human endeavor, shining our light, casting a challenge into the face of the enemy. We ought to be saying to the world, "We are here, we are many, we are strong, and we are not going away. Deal with us."

No matter what area of life the young people of your family or church are entering, remind them that they represent Jesus Christ, and that His instructions are plain: Stand up and be counted. Let everyone know who you are without shame and without fear. Don't grudgingly admit that you are a Christian when backed into a corner; rather, make sure everyone around you knows that you are *His*. Be a *shining light* in a dark world!



From the Superintendent

The Lord has graciously and copiously placed within our ranks many special people. Of course every contribution in every way is valuable. However, there are those a mongus whose influential presence lives long after they have been promoted to their eternal

reward. One such couple of historical importance to bless this conference and denomination was the Reverend and Mrs. A. H. Butler. Their first daughter, Mary Louise, has provided an additional method through which her ministry and that of her parents will live on perpetually. Her will provides the Butler Ministerial Scholarship Trust. Ministerial students from the North Carolina Conference of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church may secure additional information and an application by writing to the conference superintendent.

ALMAN HOLMES BUTLER (The Reverend A. H. Butler)

ALMAN HOLMES BUTLER was born on June 3, 1875, the son of John Wesley Butler and Elizabeth (Betsy) Catherine Parsons Butler, on the Butler family farm in Sampson County, North Carolina. Rev. Butler was educated at the Belvoir School and Glenco Academy, and received his college preparatory and college education at Salemburg College and Dunn Academy. He taught for six years in the schools of Sampson, Bladen, and Harnett counties before entering the ministry of the Methodist Church in 1895.

Rev. Butler was attracted to the growing Holiness movement of the late 1890s and early 1900s. He was ordained in the ministry of the Holiness Church in November 1903, not long after his marriage to Gatsie Louise Stanton of La Grange, North Carolina. Living in Goldsboro and later Kinston but deeply involved in the church regionally, Rev. Butler served on conference bodies that oversaw the readoption of the name Pentecostal Holiness Church and investigated union with the Fire-Baptized Baptist Church. In January 1911, Rev. Butler presided at the convention in Falcon, North Carolina, that approved the union of those two bodies as the Pentecostal Holiness Church; a monument at the restored Tabernacle in Falcon commemorates this event. After residing in Goldsboro and Kinston, the Butlers settled

in Falcon in 1921. Rev. and Mrs. Butler raised seven children.

Rev. Butler served as Superintendent of the North Carolina Conference of the Pentecostal Holiness Church for 15 years. He also served as Assistant General Superintendent, member of the General Board, and member of the Foreign Missions Board. Rev. Butler was Secretary of the Board of Trustees for The Falcon Orphanage and participated in negotiations that resulted in annual appropriations to the home from the Duke Endowment.

Rev. Butler was an organizer of churches throughout the southeastern United States; served pastorates in eastern North Carolina cities and counties; participated in numerous camp meetings; and was a general Christian evangelist in the eastern United States and Canada. His ministry covered a period of 68 years.

Rev. Butler died on February 5, 1963, and is buried in Falcon in the church cemetery behind his home and across the street from the Pentecostal Holiness Church conference meeting grounds.

GATSIE LOUISE STANTON BUTLER was born on January 27, 1881, in La Grange, North Carolina. She was the daughter of Dallas Mifflin (D. M.) Stanton, a successful businessman, and Mary Elizabeth Scarborough Stanton. The Stantons were a prominent family of La Grange. Gatsie Stanton was educated at the Kinsey School for Girls and the Kinsey Seminary for Girls, and in the La Grange schools, before attending and graduating from State Normal and Industrial College for Women (now the University of North Carolina at Greensboro).

In 1903, during a revival meeting conducted by the thenleading Holiness Church evangelist A. B. Crumpler, Miss Stanton served as organist for some of the services, attending the services over the objection of her father – the Stantons were mainline Protestants who did not totally approve of the advocates of sanctification and holiness as represented by Rev. Crumpler. It was at the La Grange revival that Miss Stanton met one of Rev. Crumpler's young assistants, Rev. Alman H. Butler. Miss Stanton and Rev. Butler were married later that year.

After living in Goldsboro and later Kinston, the Butlers eventually settled in 1921 in Falcon, North Carolina, the scene of several notable events in Rev. Butler's life of service in the

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Pentecostal Holiness Church. Already the parents of six children, their seventh and last child was born that same year of 1921. Mrs. Butler was a long-time member of Culbreth Memorial Pentecostal Holiness Church in Falcon. Having given up a rather privileged life in La Grange to marry and live in support of a young and often financially-challenged minister, Mrs. Butler remained at all times devoted to her home and family. She was considered exceptional in her intellect, musicianship, and creativity, and was widely known for her outstanding Christian character and influence as well as her spiritual depth, community service, and scholastic interests.

Rev. and Mrs. Butler celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary in Falcon in 1953. Mrs. Butler died on January 8, 1955, and is buried in the church cemetery behind the

Butler home in Falcon.

MARY LOUISE BUTLER EDWARDS

MARY LOUISE BUTLER EDWARDS was born September 12, 1906, in Goldsboro, North Carolina, the first daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. A. H. Butler. She was educated in the Kinston and Falcon public schools, and received her A.B. degree from East Carolina Teacher's College (now East Carolina University). She later studied at Columbia University in New York and the University of Georgia at Athens, and took an M.Ed. degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Mary Louise Butler taught in the public schools of Clinton, Burlington and Greensboro, and later and for the longest of her teaching tenures, in the Charlotte public schools. She taught various subjects, but her concentration and passion in teaching was American history. Her interest in American history was mirrored personally in a lifelong devotion to family genealogy. She published two family genealogies, A Butler Family History: William Butler/John W. Butler (Of Sampson County, North Carolina) and Their Descendants, and From the Family Tree...The Stantons/The Butlers. In addition, she published a church history, Yea, I Have a Goodley Heritage – The History of Salem United Methodist Church.

Mary Louise Butler was a member of the David Williams chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Gabriel Johnston Chapter of the Colonial Dames, the Sampson County Historical Society, and the Charlotte Music Club. She served three terms on the Archives and History Commission of the N. C. Conference of the United Methodist Church, and was a long-time member of the Hay Street United Methodist Church in Fayetteville, North Carolina, where she chaired the committee that created that church's Records and History Room.

Retiring from her teaching career in Charlotte in the early 1970s, Mary Louise Butler in 1974 married David Phillip Edwards Sr., a successful Fayetteville building contractor whose roots were in Falcon. Mrs. Edwards lived the next twenty years in Fayetteville, including her final decade alone following Mr. Edwards' death in 1984. Mrs. Edwards continued working on family genealogy and retained a keen interest in family, civic, and religious matters until her death in Fayetteville in 1994. She is buried with her parents in the cemetery behind the family home in Falcon. Mrs. Edwards was devoted to her whole family but particularly to her parents and, in her will, established the Butler Ministerial Scholarship Trust to provide grants to ministerial students in honor of the Reverend Alman Holmes Butler and his wife Gatsie Louise Stanton Butler.

BOOK REVIEWS

Pastor/Teacher Merrill Davis

• The Luggage of Life. By F.W. Boreham. Grand Rapids, MI: Kregel Publications, 1995. 246 pp.

Frank William Boreham (1871-1959) wrote more than 50 books and hundreds of newspaper and magazine articles. He was educated at Spurgeon's Pastors College in London and pastored in New Zealand, Tasmania and Australia before traveling around the world preaching the unsearchable riches of Christ. It was the late Marshall Stewart who first introduced me to Boreham, and I have been a loyal collector and reader of Boreham's books ever since. Warren Wiersbe stated, "Selecting a Boreham book is like choosing a beautiful rose from a large bouquet – you can never make a mistake." I concur. It is a life ambition to collect every single work of this great Christian of the faith.

Heavily laden with extraordinary illustrations, *The Luggage of Life* is a collection of thirty-two of Boreham's reflections on life. Each reflection can be considered food or medicine for the inner man. The central truth of this publication is that we bear each other's burdens, and should carry each other's luggage. The law of life's luggage is the Law of Christ, a sacrificial law. Boreham stated, "The difference between savagery and civilization is simply this, that we have learned to bear each other's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ." By all means possible, purchase the book.

• Cries of the Heart. By Ravi Zacharias. Nashville: Word Publishing, 1998. 224 pp. \$19.99

Oswald Chambers wrote, "Much of our distress as Christians comes not because of sin, but because we are ignorant of the laws of our own nature." How true. Subtitled Bringing God Near When He Feels So Far, the book deals with the feelings of futility that can overwhelm the heart. Tackling the tough issues of life seems to be Zacharias's specialty as he masterfully addresses the cries of the human heart such as guilt, empty pleasure, pain, runaway emotions, loneliness and remoteness from the Father.

He supplies the reader with thought-provoking questions to open up one's thought processes concerning matters of the heart. Then he conveys the various ways in which the Lord works in our lives to give purpose, meaning and fulfillment.

Of special interest is the author's evaluation of the life experiences of Job. Zacharias wrote, "God is not just the God of power in creation; He is the God of presence in our affliction. He had not abandoned Job but was with him personally" (p. 83).

In the final chapter the subject of worship is addressed. Drawing from the experiences of the Book of Malachi, the author examines the four necessary components of true worship: love, obedience, sacrifice and right motives. Without these, true worship is not possible.

Trust me. In compelling fashion, the author challenges you to draw nearer to God, realizing that God Himself is crying out to you for intimacy. You will sense the need for closeness to God after reading and contemplating the issues in this engaging piece of literature.

LINES FROM LINDA ...

I am not much of a sports enthusiast and will be the first to admit that I am not an expert on the game of football. However, being the mother of sons who played Pop Warner League football, middle school football and high school football, I have managed to learn a little bit about the game and even come to enjoy it. For years, our West Craven High School Eagles were a winning team and progressed to the championship games. Recently, however, they have been in a rebuilding mode and currently have not regained that status. Even so, our community continues to support Coach Jordan and the Eagles through this rough season. So, on Friday nights, Joe and I can often be found at the West Craven Football Stadium.

At a recent game, I found myself likening football to life. I have noticed that it takes persistence to win a football game. The object of the game is to get the ball to the goal line. Once a player has the ball in his hands, the opposing forces are out to put him down. Sometimes the ball will make it a few yards forward, and sometimes it ends up further back than the point from which it started in that play. On rare occasion, a player will be able to take the ball in from a distance of 60 to 75 yards or more. But most of the progress toward the goal comes in short gains. Two yards forward...six yards forward...until there is enough measurement to make a first down and continue to move down the field.

Isn't that the way of real life? Once we take a stand for the Lord, the devil and his forces are on our heels. We do our best to dodge him and keep on moving. Yet, most of our spiritual gains are not made in giant leaps. It takes a steady, consistent determination to grow closer to God. There are times when we move forward, and there are times when we seem to get pushed backward. Yet, like the fellow who wants to win that football game, we must get up more determined than ever to forge on. Not many of us can make the long-distance touchdown runs. Those mountaintop experiences that come occasionally are great but we can't be discouraged and give up when we stumble. It is important to remember that we win by persistence.

Another important aspect of the football game is unity among the members of the team. What if the quarterback always wanted to carry the ball, even though he couldn't possibly get it through the line? What if he would not pass it off to another team member because he was afraid that member might make a touchdown and get recognition that he wanted for himself? What if the team members did not have the same goal in mind? What if they did not cover for each other?

Sometimes we tend to forget that Christians are all working toward the same goal. It shouldn't matter who gets the credit, only that we win the game. We all have different abilities and are placed in different positions on the playing field. We must be willing to pass freely to each other and to be ready to receive when it is our turn to carry the ball. Once the ball is in our hands, it is our responsibility to do our best to take it in. If it is in the hands of a fellow Christian, we must put up a shield of prayer so that the opposition cannot keep that one from moving forward.

One other important issue is that the team must respect the coach. They must follow his direction. If they get on the field and decide to do their own thing and do not coordinate their efforts with

the strategy outlined by the coach, there will be mass confusion and no gains.

The same is true in life. Jesus is our Master Coach, and He is standing on the sidelines of every move we make. He has the winning game plan. All we need do is follow the instructions in His Word. He can be trusted to take us safely to the goal.

There is also something to be said for the support of the fans. As fellow Christians, we must be supportive of others who are on the playing field. We can't desert them when they seem to be losing. That's the time we must cheer them on. We must be loyal through the hard times.

Like I say, I don't know too much about football; but I do know that when the player carries the ball over the goal line there is much excitement in the crowd. I believe the grandstands in Heaven are full of those who are waiting for us to make it. I don't know about you, but I am going to keep on listening to the Coach and do my best to carry the ball to the goalpost. I really do want to make a TOUCHDOWN!!

TRANSFORM DAILY TASKS INTO TESTIMONIES...

The women of the Jacksonville Women's Ministries have transformed routine, mundane tasks into opportunities of intercession.

A devotion written by Barbara Johnson and published in the book *Joy Breaks* prompted me to ask each lady in our local group to make a list of trivial, routine tasks we perform on a daily basis, i.e. wash face, brush teeth, make bed, comb hair. We then assigned a separate prayer request to each task with the intent of lifting that request unto the Lord each time we perform that task.

LUIS M. AVILA

The Lord has blessed the N.C. Conference with some fantastic Hispanic ministers. Below is an article about one of our Hispanic pastors and leaders.

Luis M. Avila was born in San José, Costa Rica in 1960. His studies have taken him through high school, special studies in English, and computer studies. He became a Christian in 1979, being saved in the church of Barrio

Cuba, the mother church of the one hundred Pentecostal Holiness churches now in that country. He married Liliana Ramírez in 1982 and they have three sons, Luis Felipe, Pablo Alberto, and Andrey.

He was called to the ministry of the Word in the same year of his conversion and immediately began studies in the Pentecostal Bible Institute of Costa Rica, graduating in 1987. Luis did further work and graduated in the Advanced Studies for Ministerial Excellence. He has also done special seminary work in Guatemala, and has participated in seminars in the United States, Holland, and Brazil, dealing mostly with missions and evangelism.

He served as a professor in the Pentecostal Holiness Bible Institute in Costa Rica, taught extension courses from the same school, and served as Secretary on the Conference Board in Costa Rica for four years. He also pastored for nine years in the P.H. churches of Hatillo 8 and León XIII (the names and numbers designate geographical sectors of suburban San José).

In 1991, Luis Avila went to Guatemala as the first P.H. missionary to work in that country in recent times (Rev. Amos Bradley worked there as a P.H. missionary from 1908 to about 1915). During Brother Avila's time there, ten churches were established, the Pentecostal Holiness Church was registered with the government, and a conference was organized.

In June of 1997, Luis joined the North Carolina Conference and was put on staff by the Greenville First Church for the purpose of planting and organizing a hispanic congregation. He now has an attendance of 75 people in the services. Brother Avila is also visiting and ministering each week to hispanic groups in Snow Hill and in Morehead City. He is a member of our Hispanic Credentials Committee and provides much wisdom and guidance for those of us who work with him. The North Carolina Conference is blessed and proud to have this man of God, a product of our pioneer mission work in Costa Rica, to work among us in reaching out to the many hispanic people who have come to live among us.

THE NICARAGUA REPORT

Our congratulations and hearty WELL DONE to Pastor John Hedgepeth, Cecille Booth, and the Northwood Temple Church for their summer ministry trip in Nicaragua. Praise the Lord for this great report. Pastor Hedgepeth reports the following:

Our team of 53 members returned July 2 from a very successful campaign in Nicaragua. The team, made up of doctors, nurses, medical and evangelistic support people, has many glowing things to tell you.

Cecille Booth, the leader of the group, reports some very interesting facts about the campaign:

Last year, Rocio Pitti had given a woman the bus fare

for her husband to come from Esteli to our clinic in Managua. He was an alcoholic with liver problems. He came the next day, was treated, and gloriously saved! He is now the pastor of the new church in Esteli!

One team, when visiting a barrio in Montelimar, ministered to an old lady who said that God had shown her in a vision that He was sending someone to pray for her! That was a great blessing to the team — especially when they had 40 professions of faith in that one community! The same team picked up two girls on the way back to the hotel and won them to the Lord!

Many, many people were treated in the clinic who were malnourished and suffering from parasites, tuberculosis, upper respiratory illnesses, and other acute minor illnesses. The top part of a little 11-year-old boy's head was sewed back on. He had severed the flesh with a machete! Hospital care was secured for two children.

The new school/clinic provoked much emotion in the team, especially for those who had been there before. The building is huge! The people have worked so hard and are so proud of it!

Because of the church's generous giving, funds were provided to complete a parsonage for the main church in Esteli; to purchase blocks for walls for the new church in Esteli (at present they are worshiping under poles with a tin roof); to pay off the balance (\$1,200) needed to purchase land adjacent to the Karl Marx Barrio Church; to pay \$4,000+ for finish work on the new school/clinic; and \$10,000 toward the purchase of property adjacent to the new building.

The evangelistic team, under the director of Pastor Jose Alejandro, presented the drama 16 times with 120 professions of faith. Diane Austin ministered to 31 counseling patients and conducted two seminars to teach basic principles of counseling. The medical team, under Linda Strange's direction, saw more than 1,600 patients. The dental clinic had the following stats: 295 exams, 247 cleanings, 13 fillings, and 131 extractions. The medical team saw 156 professions of faith and two healings! To God be the glory!



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

From the Superintendent

I am thankful to the Lord for good and great people who have touched my life and that of so many others. One of those is Reverend R. G. Quesenberry (now retired) of the Appalachian Conference. Brother Quesenberry spent many years in church leadership

including eight years as superintendent of the Appalachian (then, Virginia) Conference of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church. It is with his permission that I bring to your attention the following article previously printed in the November, 1989, edition of the Virginia Conference Messenger and the 1990 November edition of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church Advocate. It is an excellent and inspiring message. (T.E.L.)

"It has been 370 years since the Mayflower landed on American soil with the little band of people who would become the rock from which this great nation was hewn. They were ordinary folks, men and women like ourselves. So why have we immortalized them?

A LIVING FAITH

"First, these people possessed a compelling vision. William Warren Sweet, dean of American church history, said, 'Religion was responsible for the founding of more colonies than any other single factor.' Why was this?

"These 'pilgrims' who came to New England were rigorous Protestants who believed in biblical Christianity. They believed that man was saved by faith in Jesus Christ and could not merit salvation by his own works. They practiced water baptism and the holy communion, and they stressed the importance of preaching. They protested the low moral standard of their day and rejected ritualistic worship and complicated forms of church government.

"These people were called 'Puritans,' the left wing of the Protestant Reformation. They suffered much persecution for their views. Though they were few in number, they were considered dangerous, and King James I vowed to drive them from the land.

"Many of the faithful met in secret for worship in cottages and homes for fear of their lives. Some were forced to flee England to Holland, and with war on the horizon, they turned their faces toward the new world, hoping for a new nation under God.

OBEDIENT FAITH

"Second, early settlers had a faith that seemed to be able to endure anything and embrace everything promised in Scripture. Their lives indicated their confidence in God.

"That faith is evident in the kind of society they built. The church was the central institution of their community. They brought every aspect of life into cohesive form under God. The structure of their political, social and cultural life was debated and decided in the church not because they had no other place to meet, but because they saw all life as lived under God and His desire to provide for their needs.

"In founding this nation our forefathers did not foresee it as it exists today, but thought themselves to be forming 'One Nation Under God.' Economics was not the primary reason for the founding of new England, rather, it was a humble, obedient faith in God.

COURAGE AND FAITH

"There is yet a third reason for the Puritans' greatness. They did not flee their homeland ignorant of the hardships that awaited them. They knew, and their decision came after much prayer and discussion.

"When arriving in the New Land, they faced the dangers they had anticipated: wild beasts, the Indians, who one day would befriend and bring them food, and the next day show up with arrows. All these dangers tested their courage and faith.

"The greatest enemy, however, turned out to be winter as they watched loved ones starve and die. At one point their daily rations consisted of five small grains of corn per person. Scurvy and other diseases took their toll until only seven were left who could walk.

"When winter passed and spring arrived, they remembered God's promise to Abraham: 'I will make thee a great nation.'

"In the spring of 1621 a friendly Indian by the name of Squanto taught the settlers how to plant corn. Other crops failed, but the Indian corn produced a good crop. When fall came it was clear they would have enough to eat through the winter.

"Being blessed as they were, Governor Bradford invited the Indians to share in a festival of prayer and gratitude. That was how Thanksgiving day began in the New World.

"If this band of people could be thankful, after all they had endured, how much more thankful should we be today with all our prosperity. Remember the words of the prophet Nehemiah: 'It is time to celebrate with a hearty meal, and to send presents to those in need, for the joy of the Lord is your strength. You must not be dejected and sad."

FORMER PENTECOSTAL HOLINESS GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT B. E. UNDERWOOD AT HOME WITH CHRIST

OKLAHOMA CITY, OK — The Rev. Bernard Edward Underwood (73), former General Superintendent of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church, died September 22 at his home in Royston, Georgia, after a ten-month-long battle with cancer.

Rev. Underwood was elected as General Superintendent of the IPHC at the church's 21st General Conference in Oklahoma City in 1989. Serving in that role granted him the honorary title of "Bishop."

During Underwood's administration, the movement in the United States experienced a net gain of 47,343 members, which marked the church's largest increase in any previous eight-year period. Membership worldwide also increased significantly. Under Underwood's leadership, the Target 2000 emphasis carried the IPHC into the 1990s by establishing the most aggressive evangelistic and church growth goals in the church's history.

Underwood servced as chairman of the Board of Administration of the Pentecostal Fellowship of North America and was instrumental in the transition of that organization from an all-white fellowship into the racially and ecumenically-inclusive Pentecostal/Charismatic Churches of North America. He was honored on March 4, 1998, by the National Association of Evangelicals for his role in 1994 in establishing the PCCNA.

Undersood served on the General Executive Board of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church for 28 years. During 16 of those years, he was the executive director of World Missions. While in this role, Underwood established and directed the development of the Centre for International Christian Ministries in London, England.

Underwood graduated from both Emmanuel College in Franklin Springs, Georgia, and Roanoke College in Salem, Virginia. He continued his education at Marshall University, Huntington, West Virginia, where he received his M.A. degree in 1954.

He authored eight published books, The Gifts of the Spirit, The Spirit's Sword, Spiritual Gifts: Ministries and Manifestations, Sixteen New Testament Principles for World Evangelization, You Shall Worship, The Ministry of Intercession, Portrait of a Pastor, and Cosmic Conflict, which he co-authored with Stuart Kelly. His book, Sixteen New Testament Principles for World Evangelization, is used in many schools as a textbook for urban church planting. Spiritual Gifts: Ministries and Manifestations has been published in five languages and

is being used around the world in classes on the gifts of the Spirit.

A native of Bluefield, West Virginia, B. E. Underwood was ordained as a minister in 1944. He spent the early years of his ministry in pastorates



in Tennessee, West Virginia and Virginia. From 1964 through 1969 and 1974 through 1977, he provided dynamic leadership as superintendent of the Virginia Conference of the IPHC.

In 1965, Underwood was elected as assistant general superintendent of the IPHC, serving in that position until 1973. He became the assistant general superintendent in 1977 and was elected vice chairman at the General Conference in 1981, a post he filled until his election as General Superintendent in 1989. He retired in August 1997.

The ministry of B. E. Underwood extended over a period of nearly 60 years. He preached and lectured throughout the United States and around the world in Bible conferences, ministers' retreats and interdenominational meetings. He served as chairman of Pentecostal Renewal Services, the classical Pentecostal track of the North American Renewal Services Committee (NARSC), on the Executive Committee of the National Association of Evangelicals (NAE), and on the Advisory Council of the Pentecostal World Conference.

"The International Pentecostal Holiness Church has lost a respected and visionary leader in the homegoing of Bishop B. E. Underwood," stated General Superintendent James D. Leggett. "He led the church through a period of significant change and growth. He was a dynamic leader and change agent in our denomination and the Pentecostal/Charismatic movement. He was a mentor to so many pastors and leaders."

B. E. Underwood is survived by his wife Esther, three children, Karen, Paul, and Pam, nine grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, and a multitude of friends and coworkers.

A memorial service was held Saturday, September 25, 1999, at the Appalachian Conference Auditorium in Dublin, Virginia.

LINES FROM LINDA...

In eastern North Carolina, we are accustomed to the hurricane warnings that come each fall. This year is no exception. Hurricane Dennis taunted and teased us as he took his time and played around off the coast before turning around and finding his way back across land. He blatantly interrupted the last summer holiday weekend and left some destruction in his path. However, little did we know that the next hurricane warning would be one that would bring such disaster as we have experienced throughout the North Carolina Conference area. From the beginning, we all knew that Floyd meant business. With wind speeds of 155 miles per hour, he soared up toward us in the Atlantic Ocean. The entire southeastern coast of the United States was in a state of emergency as we wondered where this powerful monster would come ashore. As Floyd moved northwestward, his wind speed decreased; but the widespread area of coverage and the tremendous rains that came ashore in North Carolina brought unimaginable devastation.

Joe and I had prepared for the hurricane. We expected a day or two of interruption in our schedules with perhaps a lack of power for a little while. We got out the generator and lamps, and we stocked up on canned foods and necessities. The rains began, and by Wednesday night we were having very heavy rainfall. The eye of the hurricane passed very near us during the night, but the winds were not severe enough to even awaken us. The next morning we lost power, but only for about twelve hours. We never lost our phone service. We had a few twigs and branches down, but other than that, everything seemed perfectly normal. However, on one side of us, just two miles down the road, Swift Creek was beginning to overrun its banks. A little over three miles behind us and on the other side of our house, the Neuse River was also beginning to cover territory heretofore unknown by its waters. By Friday all roads leading from our house to anywhere were impassable. The National Guard came to our town to assist our local firemen and rescue personnel and began rescue operations to remove people from flooded areas in our neighborhood. By Sunday, when we went out our driveway, the creek was within two tenths of a mile on our left and the river was edging up behind us and on our right. We were trapped on an island with no way out.

By late Sunday afternoon, after having met with our neighbors for a prayer gathering, Joe decided that we needed to leave. We did not feel that our home was threatened; however, Joe felt he needed to be in his insurance office the next day. My emotions were very torn, as there were already rumors of looting in our area. We still had power and phone service, and our pantry was well stocked with food supplies. I really wanted to stay home. So, it was with reluctance that I climbed aboard the huge National Guard truck that came to evacuate us. What we saw during that ride will forever be etched in my memory. It was truly an experience I will never forget.

We saw our local young men working with the National Guardsman as they risked their own safety and well-being to serve us. We watched them wade through mucky waters to help people aboard the truck, to deliver medications, to feed animals, and even to lift a man in a wheelchair up to the head-high level of the bed of the truck in which we were stuffed like refugees. Along much of the evacuation route, we traveled through water more than four feet deep. As the truck moved slowly, we felt the water slap under the bed of the truck and we watched the swells go out and lap against the houses alongside the road. Most of the houses had water up to the window levels and some even higher. Mobile homes were covered with water. What my eyes beheld was almost more than my mind could grasp. These were homes of our friends and neighbors. When I caught sight of Philip and Sandra McCandless' home, the tears came. (You will remember Sandra as the NC GEMS Director last quadrennium.) My heart hurt for them and the rest of our neighbors who were flooded.

After two hours, we had traveled about eight miles and finally arrived at our drop-off destination where Joe's dad picked us up. Most of the people on that truck ended up at the emergency shelter to spend the night and several days to follow. By taking an alternate route, I was able to drive into Vanceboro on Monday. A long portion of Main Street was closed and numerous homes were totally flooded in the area along the

creek bank. The town was astir with National Guardsmen, rescue personnel and the people delivering food, clothing and supplies. For the next several days, I went back into town to help with the distributions and to do what I could to assist in the relief effort. In the midst of great disaster, the good people of our area had united. Supplies came from near and far. Volunteers cooked meals for the rescue personnel. A bond of love was formed with our newly found friends, the National Guardsmen and people of other communities who took time out to care for us.

Our home was spared, and we were able to get back to our house on the following Friday night. Many of our neighbors were not so fortunate. Most of the waters are down now; but as we drive through the once flooded areas, it almost appears to be a war zone. Many of the houses have literally been gutted. All the furnishings and belongings, along with building debris, is piled up beside the roads. A lifetime's collection all stands now as a rubbish heap. It will be a while before our neighborhood is restored, but I know we will recover.

Our community was just one of many which experienced this tragedy. Thousands of people still stand in need of financial, physical and emotional support. Many of them are from our own churches. Some of our church facilities have been damaged. We must all join together to help them bring order out of this tragic chaos. It may mean personal sacrifice, but we are our brother's keepers. Now is the time to put love in action and to practice ministry.

As I reflect on the happenings of the last few weeks, several spiritual comparisons come to mind. First, I think of how we are so accustomed to hurricane warnings that we just assume they will be a here-today, gone-tomorrow experience. We might expect a little inconvenience for a few hours. But do we truly prepare ourselves for the long term? Do we have enough supplies, food, etc. to get us through an extended outage? Do we risk being unprepared? I am reminded of another alert which God's Word gives us. We have heard for so long now that Jesus is coming. Perhaps we have begun to take that message lightly? Do we have oil enough in our lamps to last, or will we have to run out to try to find more when it is possibly too late?

Secondly, I remember as I was sitting on the back of that National Guard truck, I looked around at the various people aboard. There were young, middle-aged and old, healthy and feeble, rich and poor, intelligent and simple-minded, black and white...and yet we were all in the same predicament. We were all trying to escape the flood waters and get to a place of safety. As I pondered the scene before me, I was reminded of how we will stand before God on the Judgment Day. There will be no separation of races, levels of intelligence, social status, or physical condition. We will all stand before Him on the same level. The barriers that divide us must all crumble down if we are to ride the Old Gospel Ship safely into the Harbor.

Lastly, I now pass by the flooded houses where a life's belongings are stacked in disarray. I see the gutted houses and ruined vehicles; and I am reminded how temporary all these things truly are. We work hard for a lifetime to accumulate worldly goods, but there will come a time when it will all be worthless. Things that seem so important to us are really so very temporary.

As the flood waters subside and life begins to ebb back to some sort of normalcy, may we all allow this experience to awaken us to the fact that God is still in control. He's the God of the sunshine and the God of the flood. He is with us in the mountaintop experiences of life, but He is also with us in these valley times. He is faithful, and He will restore our souls! I am reminded of words from a grand old hymn:

The 'sorrows befall us and Satan oppose, God leads His dear children along;

Through grace we can conquer, defeat all our foes, God leads His dear children along.

Away from the mire, and away from the clay, God leads His dear children along.

Away up in glory, eternity's day, God leads His dear children along.

Some through the waters, some through the flood, Some through the fire, but all through the blood;

Some through great sorrow, but God gives a song,

In the night season and all the day long.

WOMEN IN ACTION

It started about four years ago as a dream of only a handful of women. The vision was to open a center to supply the needs of our community. Although Vanceboro, NC, is a relatively small town, a burden was on the hearts of these women to provide for physical needs, such as clothing and food, and to witness to the spiritual needs by being examples of Jesus' love and mercy.

The first building in which the center was housed was a deserted building on Streets Ferry Road. It took a lot of elbow grease and many hours of time to put some order in that center. Later, as the center grew, the need for organization was recognized; and the center moved into town in what had once been the magistrate's office. Vanceboro Christian Help Center was officially organized, with selection of a board. Rules and guidelines were established. Rev. Roger Cope, a local United Methodist minister, assumed the role of Director. By now the center was no longer just serving walk-ins but was also delivering food to from 40 to 200 people per month. It has been a miracle to see the progress of this center. It has never operated under a specific church denomination, but it has prospered and been blessed of God to be ecumenical. The volunteers have come from many different churches, and they work in many various

I believe the most beautiful witness that I have ever seen has been during the recent devastation of Hurricane Floyd. There was a tremendous outpouring of food, clothing, supplies and household furnishings. But even more of a blessing was to see the people of our church, Holly Hill, and the community pull together to work where needed to help the victims. The devastation that took so many people's homes and possessions and reduced them to piles of rubbish can be rebuilt. But the spirits of those who cared enough to share their time, efforts and the love of God with others will minister to the spirit of these people who are affected and will be remembered after all signs of the flood are gone.

Yes, the Vanceboro Christian Help Center will continue to operate long after homes have been rebuilt, roads repaired and children are back in school. It will do so because this center was begun as a result of a handful of people who desire to witness the love of Jesus to others, and there will always be people who

need the Lord.

The occasion was Feast of Ingathering 1999. This annual event is when the Women's Ministries leadership, along with friends of the college, gather to present funds that have been raised in the local Women's Ministries groups and their churches for the support of the many projects at our Pentecostal Holiness Church-supported institutions of higher education. This event at Emmanuel College was second to none, and it was quite evident they were prepared to thank us graciously for what our people had worked so hard to present to them.

Some behind pushing, some ahead pulling, and someone saying, "Come on, you can make it." Christ is the rock upon which Emmanuel College is built. Women's Ministries is part of the team that supports the students as they keep

BREAKING BARRIER CONFERENCES

Forty percent of churches in America have less than fifty-five in attendance on Sunday morning.

Sixty percent have less than one hundred. Eighty-five percent have less than two hundred. And ninety-five percent have less than four hundred. Ninety-eight percent have less than eight hundred.

Churches within the N.C. Conference have similar statistics. Fifty percent of the conference churches have less than fifty-five. This amounts to eighty-seven churches. (The consideration is organized churches, not all the preaching points). Seventy-six percent of our churches are less than one hundred in attendance (133 churches). Ninety-two percent of our churches are two hundred or less on Sunday morning (160 churches). The Conference has only fourteen churches that average more than two hundred in worship attendance. The figure is even smaller for Sunday School attendance. There are only four churches that average more than two hundred in Sunday School attendance.

A casual view of these stats show that the Conference is below the national average. The purpose here is not to be critical nor reflective, but only to say that there is work to be done. God is not dead! The Spirit is alive. God's purpose is to work through His children to bring His lost children home. There is no shortage of sinners. They are everywhere.

The N.C. Conference Evangelism Ministries is committed to work through the local church to win the lost. The local church is the key to reaching those without Christ in communities. In order to be a help to local church leadership, the Evangelism leadership has invited Dr. Owen Weston to speak in the Conference.

Dr. Owen Weston is an expert in the church world today in church planting and revitalization. He has personally planted and revitalized several churches. He not only knows the theory, but he has "done it."

Dr. Weston presently is the Director of Church Planting and Revitalization for the IPHC. He works with Dr. Ronald Carpenter and Evangelism USA, Oklahoma City. He will be in the Conference, November 1 - 4.

New Life Christian Adoptions is located in Gamer, North Carolina, and operates as a part of the overall programming of ATAM, Inc., under the supervision of General Coordinator, Marvin R. Whitfield and the ATAM, Inc. Board of Directors. ATAM, Inc., located in Salemburg, North Carolina, was established in 1992 as an outreach ministry of the Falcon Children's Home, Inc., to serve as an umbrella agency for human services programming. To date, ATAM, Inc. has opened the Royal Home, a maternity home for young women who are faced with unplanned pregnancies and New Life Christian Adoptions, a second maternity home to be located in Greenville, North Carolina, is currently under renovation and will open soon. Superintendent Clark serves as Executive Director of ATAM, Inc. Ronald C. Butler, Associate Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs, Emeritus, North Carolina State University, is Director of New Life Christian Adoptions. Mr. Butler guided the final months of coordination with the State of North Carolina Division of Social Services that led to licensing. The agency's first social worker, Deborah Hairr, has eight years of social services experience. She reported to work on August 16. New Life Christian Adoptions will serve the adoption needs of the members of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church and others who choose the Christian adoption option. The people who adopt children are generally those who have a desire to share their love and experience the joy and satisfaction of helping a child grow up to be a productive, happy, fulfilled adult.

God Meant It for Good: A Fresh Look at the Life of Joseph. By R. T. Kendall. Charlotte: MorningStar Publications, 1986. 253 pp. \$8.95

Why is it that although Scripture is replete with commands and exhortations to forgive others even to the point of going the extra mile to

show God's mercy and kindness, that some Christians find it so hard to forgive? A common response goes like this, "But you don't know what that person did to me."

Few people have endured such harsh treatment as Joseph of the Old Testament. Yet he was able to maintain a forgiving spirit through it all. This book offers a fresh look at the exemplary life of Joseph, who maintained his integrity and a correct view of God and His ways. This man, possessor of the technicolored coat, understood well that what men meant for evil, God can design for temporal and ultimate good.

By providing homiletically rich material, Dr. Kendall once again has published a must-read for the preacher, Sunday school teacher – and any Christian for that matter – who desires to become a more effective communicator of God's Word.

Moral Earthquakes and Secret Faults. By O. S. Hawkins. Nashville: Broadman and Holman Publishers, 1996. 196 pp. \$14.99

Os Guinness stated, "Despite its historic political and economic triumphs, the American Republic is entering its own time of reckoning, an hour of truth that will not be delayed. It is nearing the climax of a generation-long cultural revolution, or crisis of cultural authority." Fault lines that rumble just beneath the surface of American life lie in wait to set in motion moral collapses of perhaps catastrophic proportions. It's as if people are dining with the devil with a very, very short spoon.

Problematic as these moral earthquakes may seem with the world, the Church is not isolated from this moral earthquake potential. By using Bible examples of moral lapses such as Samson, David, Gehazi, Simon Peter, and the Prodigal Son, Hawkins shows what can occur when secret moral faults are not recognized and adjustments made. He stated, "When faults are left unchecked, they begin to converge and buld pressure below the surface until they finally erupt into a moral collapse."

Since earthquakes don't just happen but occur because of fault lines beneath the surface, this book provides answers as to what to look for in your own life that shows signs of possible moral lapse. Take for example the life of Samson. Here was a seemingly invincible man, a Nazirite, who had cracks in his character that made the foundation of his life unstable. His sin was inevitable. The consequences of his sin were predictable. Samson was a moral earthquake waiting to happen. His life was a prescription for disaster.

Christians must take a personal responsibility in asking the Lord to help eliminate those secret faults, those cracks which cause us to stumble. Whether it is pride, prayerlessness, wrong desires, resistance to authority, peer pressure, lying, greed or materialism, we must be vigilant in addressing secret sin.

But what about the aftermath when a Christian falls? You wouldn't think so, but one of the worst places to have a moral lapse is in the Church. Anyone can condemn, but it takes a loving and kind Christian to reach down and offer a helping hand to a wounded soldier. The author supplies comforting and non-threatening words to help us realize that God loves us and is always willing to forgive, restore, and place a fallen believer back into Christian service.



HIGH WATER MARKS

For those affected by the recent flooding, **high water** represents hardship, suffering, and great loss. The term **"high water mark"** has unpleasant connotations — understandably so — because many homes bear a literal mark showing how deeply under the flood waters they were buried.



In the weeks since the flood, I have heard story after story of suffering and loss, but also report after report of kindness, heroism, and selflessness.

- A man who, at great danger to himself, rescued scores of people from rising waters with a small boat.
- A woman who took into her home another family whose home had been lost.
- A couple who, unmindful of the stench, helped transfer rotten food from a freezer into garbage bags.
- Two teenage girls who handed \$40 saved from their allowance to their piano teacher to take to her parents, who had lost their home.
- A man who hauled and set up a travel trailer at his own expense, and paid the lot rent to provide shelter for people he did not know.
- A couple who offered the use of a house at no charge to a homeless family – then gave it a thorough cleaning before they moved in.
- A store owner who doubled the value of a Red Cross furniture voucher.

I could tell a hundred more stories like this, stories of people who did not have much themselves but who gave selflessly to others whose need was greater. Ordinary people have risen to new heights of goodness – just because it was the right thing to do.

I have always viewed the **high water mark** of a life as the pinnacle, the extreme height to which someone rose — and I still choose to see it that way. Sure there were looters, sure there were gougers, sure there were people who sank to new depths – but there were also hundreds, thousands, who displayed in their lives a new **high water mark** during this time of crisis.

I am reminded of the words of Jesus, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." With the passage of enough time the marks of "Flood Floyd" will be eradicated from Eastern North Carolina, but I believe these "high water marks" of the spirit will endure for all eternity.



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From the Superintendent

The Lasting Joy of Christmas

Luke 2:10 "Behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people." Luke 2:14 "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

The glorious announcement of the birth of Jesus Christ our Lord came as a powerful sunrise of joy to a world where sorrow, pain and varied suffering are known to every person and real joy rarely comes from the circumstances of life. It seems that in so many lives even when real joy does come it doesn't stay very long. The joy the angel brought to those amazed shepherds was not to be a transient, emotional moment, but was to be a lasting state of joy. This eternal joy resulted from the announcement that proclaimed, "in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord," was born. (Luke 2:11)

There was an overwhelming reality of spiritual, emotional and physical health that seemed to flow out of that announcement to the shepherds.

The coming of the Christ into the world informed the world of something it needed to hear in terms it could understand. The announcement proclaimed that He would come to be born of a woman to make Himself of no reputation and, having been found and fashioned as a man, to humble himself to death, even to death on a cross. The fact of His coming is so meaningful and so pungent with the glory of God that it escapes the descriptive power of pen or tongue. Multitudes of writers of poetry and prose have sought to describe it through the centuries only to find themselves inadequate for the task.

What did this birth of the Lord Jesus Christ tell our real world?

The birth of Jesus emphasized that God's purpose for human life is not just physical or emotional or temporary, but basically the purpose of God for human life is spiritual. You see, the eternal Word of the Father donned Himself with human flesh, thereby signifying the fact that man's origin is divine. The incarnation of Christ does raise some questions, but it answers so many more. The questions it raises are simply and purely the rationale of the human mind which is at best only speculative. The questions the incarnation settles are deeply spiritual, moral and essentially basic to the welfare of men's souls. The incarnation answers affirmatively the question of man's creation in the image and likeness of God. The coming of the Lord Jesus Christ proves the fact to be literally true.

His birth told the world that God really is real. He is not some ghostly, unreal nonexistent wisp of the imagination. The heavens opens its doors and a new world came into view for the heart of man. A divine message came from beyond the immediate world about us. That message sounded "glory to God in the highest," as it was given by a host of angels. The shepherds to whom this announcement was given knew all about the earth and the world about us; now they were hearing from another world, the world of God in Heaven above. At the moment of that announcement the earthly world of the shepherds and the world of heaven blended into one glorious panorama of activity. This should not amaze

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us that it was with wonder that they went hurriedly to see Him who had come to them from the heart of God. To these precious shepherds God was no longer just a hope, a desire that He might exist. They understood after that night that God really is real!

The birth of our Lord Jesus Christ told the world that man is lost but he's not left alone and abandoned. If this were not the case no savior would have been needed. If the world of men had been abandoned then God would not care and would not have sent His son to save us. But the glorious fact is that He did come and he settled forever the question of whether or not God has a concern for the human race. Although man may have broken every commandment of God and sinned in innumerable ways the Lord has not forgotten us. "For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." (Luke 19:10)

The birth of our Lord and Savior verified the word of the prophets of the Old Testament. His birth declared that the priests who were learned men of the scriptures and the scribes who transcribed those scriptures into the language of the people were in fact men who had been informed from Heaven. They could believe the scriptures that said that the Messiah was to be born in Bethlehem of Judea. After that night, to a thinking mind, the Old Testament would be a living book because they would see that book in the person of Jesus Christ. After that momentous night of His birth it would seem to them that all the prophets and patriarchs of the ages would gather about them as they studied the scriptures from a prophetic slant of view.

The Old Testament account is so full of prophecies concerning the Messiah that it would seem impossible for one man to fulfill all those prophecies. However, our Lord Jesus Christ did just that. His incarnation affirmed the reality of the Old Testament scriptures even as those very same scriptures confirmed the reality of His own claims as the Son of God.

His birth also proclaimed that the human race will not be annihilated or exterminated from existence. The Lord did not just visit the race to rescue it from its present circumstances. He came and dwelt among us as John recorded and we beheld Him; we beheld His glory. It is because of the hope he gives us that we know that the human race will not be exterminated by some base men. The misguided messages of satan will not be able to destroy the human race.

The birth of our Lord also made it clear to every-

one who will take a moment and peer into all of the treasures of His coming that this world is not all there is to it. Our Lord Jesus Christ spoke with all certainty of the world to come. He told us of things that He had seen and heard in the Heavens. He even told us that He is preparing a mansion for those of us who love and serve Him; those saved by His precious blood. You see, we are created not for just one world but for two worlds. Just as certainly as now we inhabit earth we shall one day inhabit the place He is preparing for us. Finally, but certainly not least, His birth tells us that death has been conquered and someday will be abolished and that life and love and liberty will last forever in the immortality promised us in the word of God. "For this purpose the son of God was manifested, that he might destroy the works of the devil." (1 John 3:8). What worse work has satan accomplished than to bring sin into the world of man and through sin produce death? Remember the appearance, death and resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ annihilates death and brings to every believer eternal and abundant life and immortality in this world through Him and in the world to come.

To God be the glory! It's Christmas time!

A Season of Giving

Report by the North Carolina DRUSA Coordinator Danny Nelson

"Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me" (Matthew 25:40)

The week after Hurricane Floyd struck, I agreed to serve as Disaster Relief coordinator for the North Carolina Conference. I had no idea at the time of the scope and magnitude of the catastrophe that had just swept our state. Today I have a deeper and growing appreciation of the blessings of life.

Since the storm, our Lord's statement in Matthew 25:40 has taken on new meaning for me. Even as I write this article, thousands of families in Eastern North Carolina continue to cope with grave losses. Many are still in shock, unable to assess what it's going to take in terms of money and time to return to

some sense of normalcy.

Over the past several weeks I have made several trips into the disaster areas. Two excursions especially impressed me. A few days after the hurricane, I took a video camera into the stricken areas, where permitted. Two weeks later I made virtually the same trip when the waters had begun to subside. The scenes I recorded have marked my life. The recovery will be long-term and expensive, and I pray that the IPHC will not forget or dismiss this pressing need. If we do, we will have missed the message of Matthew 25:40. Complete restoration will require more than a one-time offering or truck load of food. Though these gifts are welcomed and appreciated, we, as a church, must rally to long-term support of Eastern North Carolina, especially those of our IPHC family.

The homes of approximately 6,300 families were totally destroyed; another 8,000-plus had their homes declared unhabitable until extensive renovations are made. Add to that another 25,000-plus homes that suffered minor to severe damages, and we're faced with an enormous price tag, not to mention the loss of lives. Many vehicles were destroyed, and scores of businesses were shut down, resulting in loss of jobs and income.

Every family's loss was personal and tragic. Take, for instance, the 100-year-old lady who had taught Sunday school for many years in the Carson Memorial Church. She lost everything. Or, consider the cases of other senior adults who had looked forward to their retirement years. Now they have no homes. And how

about the family in Kinston who owned a carpet business. The father is an immigrant from Russia. Though devastated by the flood, the family was already in their place of business, preparing to open before the waters had receded. I'm also reminded of many cases of young families with children who had their home totally destroyed. Several PH pastors and retired ministers lost everything. Four of our churches sustained extensive damage, yet they had little or no flood insurance. One made an especially strong impression on me. Posted on the door of the Carson Memorial Church in Greenville was a sign that read: "This building is condemned until extensive renovation is done and further inspection will then be made." I pray that sign will be removed soon.

The damages left behind by Hurricane Floyd were different from those caused by Hurricane Andrew in 1992 in South Florida. A large part of Andrew's losses were covered by insurance, because the water damages were caused by the winds. The vast majority of Floyd's losses were from rising waters (flood). Consequently they are NOT covered by conventional insurance.

To date, we have record of 174 IPHC families who lost their homes and four churches (Trenton, Carson Memorial, New Vision, Springs of Living Water) that sustained moderate to total destruction from the flood. Thank God that the IPHC family has responded. We have received approximately \$180,000.00 to assist our people in recovery. Many churches and individuals have sent monies directly to churches and families. There is no way to tally those amounts accurately, but thank you, and to God be the glory. Thank you, too, for sending and delivering numerous loads of food and building materials to the stricken areas. Many work teams have volunteered countless hours of labor removing debris and repairing homes. Groups outside the IPHC also have volunteered to help.

Pastors and their church families in the distribution areas also deserve a heartfelt thank you for their tireless efforts in responding to the needs of the church and community. I encourage and challenge churches, Church Education Ministries Departments, Women's Ministries, Missionettes, Royal Rangers, Men's Ministries, Sunday schools, youth groups, senior adult fellowships, singles groups, and individual families to seriously consider adopting a family or church for ongoing support and contact during the long recovery process. The holiday season is approaching. What could be more appropriate than to adopt a family on which to heap prayer, personal contact and financial support during this time of thanksgiving and reflection?



The country style dinner at the Hershey Farm Restaurant was a special treat. At each site visited, the ladies were ministered to uniquely. Even on the bus, as hymns and choruses were sung and testimony given, God blessed and touched hearts.

Special thanks to Marjorie Teachey for organizing the trip and to Blanche Pollard for serving as the Happy Hearts Conference Director. Those who made the trip to Red Hook are already asking them to plan another one for next year.

1/2 pound pecan halves 1 egg white


1/2 cup sugar





From the Superintendent

Psalm 29:10-11 (NKJV) "The Lord sat enthroned at the Flood, and the Lord sits as King forever.

The Lord will give strength to His people; The Lord will bless His people with peace."

A few months ago in September of 1999 many areas of the eastern United States experienced a new trauma for us. We recall those days because they were so tumultuous due to the devastating effects of Hurricane Floyd. Never before do we have any recorded account of eastern North

Carolina receiving such a deluge of water. Floods are powerful in their impact. The scriptures record the flood of all floods, the one of Noah's day. Yet the Psalmist speaks in Psalm 29 and he informs us that the Lord sits on the flood. What a powerful truth this suggests to us for daily living as well as in unusual crisis moments.

The verses of this Psalm march to the drumbeat of a powerful truth. Over and over we seem to hear the dread forces of the heavens firing round after round while peal after peal of thunder and flashing of light falls in the wake of the storm. The first verses of this chapter are a call to the adoration of our God. Notice the Word says, "give unto the Lord, O you mighty ones, give unto the Lord glory and strength. Give unto the Lord the glory due to His name: worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness." In the verses following, the path of a tempestuous storm is outlined, the attributes of God's divine word are rehearsed, and God himself is glorified in all the grandeur of His powerful presence. But the last verse of this chapter, like the calming refreshing aftermath of a rainstorm in the hot season, joyously and delicately closes the tumultuous scene with the assurance that the almighty God is available to give strength and peace to His people. Someone has aptly written of this Psalm, "it is a noble song to be sung in stormy weather."

In some respects it would be inappropriate to speak of our entrance upon this new year, 2000, as a stormy one, yet the very fact that we are entering an untried journey provides an element of stress to life, makes us reflectful and thoughtful, and sometimes even a bit fearful, as people are apt to be when in the midst of a mighty onslaught of wind, or under some radiant display of electrical storm from the sky, or in keeping with our emphasis gazing, upon a great flood flowing by, ever creeping higher with its destructive waters. However, there's great comfort and solace for us during these times of every possible stress in life that can be imagined. Those thoughts of comfort and strength are powerfully resilient by one brief expression in this Psalm; "the Lord sat enthroned at the Flood." Think of these words as they might relate to the circumstances of our entrance upon this new year, new decade, new century, and most emphatically, a new millennium.

First of all, these words suggest a crisis situation. A flood provides for upheaval. It is true that the earlier years of the twentieth century were full of upheaval. This upheaval was evident in the intellectual world and especially in the world of international relationships. Added to this the multitude of new inventions, new discoveries, never before tried methods of teaching, of learning, and new philosophies have assaulted our minds, including those of a religious nature. New expressions of old doctrines and truths have invaded the sacred precincts of our thinking. Escalated modes of travel and new opportunities to travel have fulfilled Daniel's prophecy suggesting that many would run to and fro and that knowledge is being increased. There is also upheaval in the moral world. People are facing, as never before, moral problems associated with marriage, divorce, abortion, and legalized gambling to name a few of those areas of tension.

There is also much spiritual upheaval and I hope there will be more. The last century has ended with an intense interest in the hereafter and many people are making contact with reality that goes beyond this present life. This suggests to me more than just a wistful dream but an intense hunger for God. You see there is no peace among the unsaved because they are wicked and their disturbed emotions and minds are like the waves of the sea that cannot find a place to relax. In addition, Christians long for a higher life and we know that it's available for us. In a book I read recently titled **THE GOD CHASERS**, I saw this emphasis wisely addressed. There is a hunger and many churches are opening their formats of activity to the control of the Holy Ghost more than ever before. It is a day to cease relaxing in traditions

that have been encrusted with use and age and launch our faith into a new arena of activity so that God will bless His people and move upon His Church as never before. There's a hunger for God in the land!

Secondly, a flood is indicative of resistless power. As we noted during Hurricane Floyd, a flood breaks down dams; barriers. They burst through buildings and invade field and forest with their resistless progression. The flood of years provides a breaking down of barriers. The year 2000 is coming in with an onrush in our intellect with vast vistas of information and learning like never before. While we want to be open to what the flood is bringing that is good and cleansing, we must allow that which is useless and does not contribute to our good to be swept away by the flood. However, let me caution us to grab the valuables, the valuables of integrity and truth, honesty and loyalty, to name a few. We must not let these valuables be swept away by the flood of the new year, decade, century and millennium. In the area of morals there are fences that we must make sure the flood does not sweep that have safeguarded our children and young people. There are social restraints in our culture that have held back much evil and we must allow these barriers to stand. We must not let the flood of the years disturb that which is solid and faithful to God's Word. In the realm of religion there has been far too much a liberalizing tendency to a relaxed lifestyle where anything goes when nothing is declared as wrong or evil. This attitude has swept in its torrent multitudes from their moorings and has allowed them to float on a flood of unbelief as well as disbelief. The same resistless power is seen in the case of international relationships. We must do all possible to keep the "peace on earth, good will to men" of the Christmas season alive through the year and the years.

A flood also portrays tension and stress. I do not wish to be viewed as pessimistic and in no way do I believe that all is bad but I do believe we must recognize the bad. We cannot shut our eyes to the fact that in the case of all floods there is a serious element of fatigue and danger. You see, we discovered that a flood is very likely to be furious and violent and utterly destructive. It does have a cleansing, life promoting and beneficial aspect. But a flood can go easily beyond the boundaries of the river and become the agent of destruction. Our response to the flood is what determines our course in days to come. We can allow the flood to destroy us by becoming bitter and cynical or we can take positive action in the power of the Holy Spirit and a lifestyle dedicated to the cause of Christ.

Do not be dismayed by the powerful upheaval of the flood crisis of the years. In the very midst of the flood we must receive a new inspiring revelation from the heart of God that will rid us of every fear knowing that all things work together for good to those who love God; to the called according to His purpose." In the midst of the flood we have a comforting God! Again, "the Lord sitteth upon the flood." This position of supremacy is one of calm assurance, of confident ability and of tranquility. You see God is conscious both of His right and His power to reign. The Lord has no sense of misgiving or incapacity. He is aware that He can control with ultimate ease. Those who trust in God and believe in Him and walk with Him have the same assurance. We are keenly aware that nothing is too difficult for Him to do. We remind ourselves and each other that He upholds all things by the Word of His power and He can certainly guide all things so that they will work for His glory and the good of the human family. He is supremely capable in the intellectual, moral, social, political, international, and interracial arenas. And praise God He is super capable in the spiritual realm too! You see He sets the boundaries for the floods; He even holds the sea in the hollow of His hand. Simply, to quote one well-known passage, let me remind you as I close this article of some facts: "To whom then will ye liken me, or shall I be equal? saith the Holy One. Lift up your eyes on high, and behold who hath created these things, that bringeth out their host by number: he calleth them all by names by the greatness of his might, for that he is strong in power; not one faileth... Hast thou not known? hast thou not heard, that the everlasting God, the Lord, the Creator of the ends of the earth, fainteth not, neither is weary?" Isaiah 40:24-28. That's our God and He's God forever. Praise His Name! He is infinite in love and wisdom and power. We can afford to trust Him. We can never afford to doubt Him. And now as we have entered this new year of 2000 even though there may be some thing about us that suggest a flood, we know that His unfailing presence will give us never failing hope and ever increasing joy in the comforting of the fact that the Lord sits upon the flood!

Whatever the new year is bringing your way know that you are safe as the apple of His eye in the hollow of His hand, because you dwell in the shadow of the Almighty.

It has served 124 clients from the states of NC, TX, VA and SC, which embrace 6 conferences. On April 30, 1999, the home in Salemburg became debt-free.

A second home has been purchased in Greenville, NC, and is being renovated. This home will serve 6 clients and will open in January 2000.

NewLife Christian Adoptions was licensed in July 1999 with its office in Garner, NC.

These ministries are made possible through the prayers and faithful financial support of individuals, conferences, churches and businesses.

ATAM, Inc., observes SOHLS in January each year. This promotion was adopted by the General Conference in 1997. Some of the goals for this special day are:

Today is a brisk, cold day. When I opened the door this morning, my thought was, "It is cold enough to kill hogs." Now some of you may not understand that, but it brought back lots of memories for me. My mother was a great country cook. She always had a table full of mostly homegrown foods... collards, beans, potatoes, ham or pork chops. Yes, we grew the ham and pork chops too. It was also about this time of year when we had hog-killing day. It must have always been the coldest day of the year. We children were awakened very early; but by the time we got outside, Daddy and the men folk had the hogs in the scalding vat. A roaring fire was burning around one wash pot full of water, and the other one had wood stacked around it to make a fire to cook the fat for making lard. We were not allowed to watch the actual "killing" of the hogs, but it was a morbid sight to me to see the men roll them in the scalding water, scrape the hair from their skin, and then hang them on the gallows to be butchered.

Even though it was hard work, this was always a special day as family and neighbors joined in to help us, as we did them when it was their turn. The men did the butchering and "salting down" while the ladies cut up the meat to make sausage and the fat for lard. When the lard was cooked, the remains that were dipped out were pressed to make "cracklings." The skins were trimmed and cooked for snacks. Almost every part of the hog was used in some way. Yes, I even helped clean the chitterlings!

At lunchtime, there was a table full of good fresh meats and homegrown vegetables. Pork stew and sweet potatoes, fried pork chops and collards were almost surely to be a part of this meal. One favorite was the stewed Irish potatoes with onions. Mama would season them with a little bacon grease, salt and lots of black pepper. She cooked them slowly and stirred them often so they would thicken. What a feast we enjoyed! At day's end, the neighbors each left with some of the fresh meat as a gift of thanks for their help.

As a result of that day's work, there we had plenty of meat at our house. Country ham for breakfast and pork roast or a boiled shoulder cut for supper. When we sat down at our table for a meal, we enjoyed the fruit of our labor.

But what I must remember is that there was much more to all this than the reaping of the vegetables from the garden or the "hog-killing" day. Preparation for the bounty had begun much earlier. For the garden to produce, the soil had to be plowed and fertilized and the seed had to be planted. As the plants grew they had to be weeded and tended in order to produce a good harvest. The pork, which we enjoyed, started at the birthing of new baby pigs. Daddy had to see that the mother sow nurtured her little ones until they were weaned and ready for food. He then fed them an age-appropriate diet to produce the best meat product.

Now, all this may sound gross to some of you city people,

but it was reality out on the farm. And as I think back on those days, I am blessed to have learned some of life's greatest lessons through such events as this. I learned what it means to work together with family and neighbors and how to share the fruit of our labor. I learned that there must be some preparation in order to produce a good result. I learned the principle of sowing and reaping.

So, this cold morning I'm looking back, but I am also looking to the future. I trust that in my remembering, I will also in some way be able to pass on some of the values that I learned through childhood experiences to my children and grandchildren. They may never experience a "hog killing," but I hope the principles I learned from such events can in some way be instilled in them as well. I'm also really glad God showed Peter that pork is suitable food—for I really do love pork chops!! Pork chops, collards, stewed potatoes and baked corn bread — that's tonight's menu! Come on over for supper.



In Memorium Rev. Mrs. Mozelle Huggins Dowd 1916-1999

Into the home of Mr. Thomas and Daisy Jones, a beautiful baby girl was born on July 4, 1916. They named her Mozelle.

Mozelle was educated in the Fayetteville schools. During these years God had His hand and loving care upon this young lady's life

She was born again by the spirit of God at an early age, between eight and ten years of age. The death of a dear friend caused Mozelle to plead with God for someone to tell all young people everywhere that happiness is found in the Lord.

At the age of 16 she conducted a revival in Bennetsville, South Carolina, where God saved so many until the church became too small to accommodate the people. They moved to the courthouse auditorium for the continuance of the revival. Mozelle Jones Huggins was a holiness preacher all her life.

Mozelle met a handsome young man by the name of Isaac Monroe Huggins. They were married on March 4, 1934. They began their long and fruitful life together. God smiled upon this union by giving them six children, I.M. (Ike) Jr., Oscar Lee, Myra (Roberts), Margaret (Thomas), Annette (Smith), and Beverly (Raynor). Each of the children remain active in their respective churches today. Mozelle proudly claimed six children, twenty-three grandchildren and thirty-five great-grandchildren.

Mozelle started the Stedman church in prayer meetings. Today it is one of our largest. She organized the West Area church and remained pastor for 23 years. The church was later moved to Lyon Memorial Church where she pastored until retirement in 1979. She was a member of the North Carolina Conference for 50 years. She was the first lady ordained in this conference.

Everyone that knew Mozelle Huggins would say she was a chosen vessel, used of God most all her life.

On Saturday, October 2, 1999, she went home to be with her

Lord, and the host of others she won to the Lord.

Yes, there has definitely been sowing, pruning, weeding, and we are truly looking to God for the harvest.

The International Pentecostal Holiness Church as a churchtype mission with the Reverend T. Elwood Long officiating at this service. Praise God for His goodness and for His covering.

Going from one day to the next and from one service to the next, not knowing what is going to happen or even where you will be located, is truly stepping out on faith. Yet at the same time, it has been an adventure of a lifetime and there is all the comfort you need when you know God is with you. Pastor Bland has proclaimed that there is going to be a great outpouring of the Holy Spirit in our city and we are looking for this to happen in our city and throughout the world. By J. Wallace Hamilton. New Jersey: Fleming H. Revell Company, 1970. 191 pp.

With extraordinary insight into human nature, J. Wallace Hamilton skillfully presents chapter after chapter of challenging messages that will serve any minister or layperson with much food for thought and lessens to share. The pastor of Pasadena Community Church in St. Petersburg, Florida, for forty years was not seminary or college trained, but his writings offer so much in terms of Spirit-born and Spirit-guided preaching. It has been estimated that tens of thousands came to hear this man preach.

Still the Trumpet Sounds is a selection of sermons delivered by the author that are built around the central theme that in spite of all the learning mankind has gained, man must still deal with the fact of God. while the world asks, "Who needs God?," the need for God and His plan, and His Son could never be greater. No one can silence the Christian message for God is able to make even the wrath of men to praise Him. No matter how hard men try to ignore or avoid the reality of God, the divine pull is always there in the life of every human being. No one can escape God. As Augustine said long ago, "Thou hast made us for Thyself, O God, and restless are our hearts until they rest in Thee."

Let me encourage you to search for this book, unless it is already in your possession, and the few remaining books Hamilton had written during his ministry. You can thank me later.

2. The Second Coming of the Church

By George Barna. Nashville: Word Publishing. 223 pp.

The strength of this hard-hitting book about the present day Church and as to where it is going is that George Barna strips away the facade and curtain of the current status of the Church and reveals some of its major problems, issues and concerns. I am troubled,



however, with the idea that the Church must reinvent itself in the 21st century in order to be effective. Perhaps it is a matter of semantics, but the whole concept of "reinvention" troubles me. Did God make a mistake initially?

Most effective leaders agree that change is necessary if the Church of today is to be adequate in meeting the needs of people all around the world. Change must occur in the Church to cope with the rapid changes of society and the needs of humanity. However, as the New Testament reveals, the pattern of the New Testament church was established in the early days of the Church, and I believe that pattern must never be tampered with or "reinvented." Jesus Christ will continue to build His Church until such time the Bride is complete and ready to be presented to the Bridegroom. No amount of new learning or new ways of doing things will change that truth.

Should the local Church become a smorgasbord of services that will satisfy almost any palate, young or old, and serve as a spiritual pit-stop in the fast-paced world of the 21st century, or should the local Church stick to the Big Four of what the Church used to do, the Apostles' doctrine, fellowship, breaking of bread and prayers (Acts 2:42)? What is a true New Testament church anyway?

Barna offers some hard medicine for Church leaders to consider. His main premise is that culture reinvents itself every 3 to 5 years, and the burden of the Church is to change just as rapidly in order to keep pace. Even preaching is not exempt from change in Barna's reinvention of the Church of tomorrow. He is afraid that the Church will lose its platform to communicate and challenge this new generation because we lag so far behind. The author advocates niche-marketing that zeroes in on the needs of people.

Whatever your position on these issues, Barna's book presents valuable sociological data that will help any Christian leader in understanding his or her times.

Anyone facing the challenges of doing God's will and reaching the next generation will find *The Second Coming of the Church* beneficial, provocative and challenging. In my opinion, I respectfully submit, dear reader, the Lord Jesus Christ never says, "Oops!"



LINES FROM LINDA...

In preparing to write this Valentine's Day article, I wanted to share something sweet and romantic. Hearts and roses seemed to fit the bill. But as I prayed and sought the Lord for what to write, I was reminded that true love goes way beyond candlelight and romance.

In this age, love is a very misunderstood word. Today's vocabulary has cheapened it. To many, love simply means

physical attraction. To some, it only lasts as long as things are going "my way." Others expect love to be like the storybook tales of riding off into the sunset of ecstasy without the rigor of life's problems.

The dictionary gives several definitions of love. Yes, it is strong affection; but it is also much, much more. The one word that I believe best describes true love is not included in Webster's book. However, it is very much exampled in



God's Book. Most of us who have lived very long know that true love involves a much more resolute word. That word is COMMITMENT.

Perhaps we are not doing a good job of teaching this virtue to our younger generation. It seems that commitment is almost a lost art in society today. More and more we are seeing the results of its lack. Job performance, church attendance, and home life are suffering because we only want to do what is convenient for us.

Our children thought I was a toughie because I usually insisted on them following through on whatever they started. Only in extreme cases did I allow them to drop out of anything. If they signed up for piano, they had to finish out the year. If they signed up to play ball, they were expected to be loyal to their coach and team. I hope this training will stick with them and benefit them in their relationships...at home, on the job, and in their spiritual lives.

Marriages and families today are suffering because people are not committed to relationships. When we stand before God and make our vows, "For better or worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health," I believe God sees that as commitment. We aren't released from that commitment the first time a bad wind blows. Hearts are broken and homes are destroyed because someone doesn't understand that love means commitment.

I must admit, I have real problems accepting excuses from

people who simply just are not committed. There is a song titled, "Love Will Find a Way"; and I guess I believe that in most instances. I know there are extreme cases when physical or emotional damage cannot be tolerated, and God knows and understands every circumstance. But we must be careful not to let the trends of the times cause us to follow the wrong examples.

Yes, I believe true love is commitment. Even when tempted to stray, commitment will cause one to stay put. Commitment will cause one to be present when perhaps valid reasoning for being absent could be offered. Being committed to a cause will give us the extra courage to stand boldly against the wiles of Satan and be willing to go through the battle to win our cause.

Let us be reminded of what God's Word says. "Love is very patient and kind, never jealous or envious, never boastful or proud, never haughty or selfish or rude. Love does not demand its own way. It is not irritable or touchy. It does not hold grudges and will hardly even notice when others do it wrong. It is never glad about injustice, but rejoices whenever truth wins out. If you love someone you will be loyal to him no matter what the cost. You will always believe in him, always expect the best of him, and always stand your ground in defending him. All the special gifts and powers from God will someday come to an end, but love goes on forever." (1 Cor. 13:4–8, TLB)

So in this Season of Love, may we all determine to put COMMITMENT in action and make it synonymous with love...in our relationships with family, with friends, and with God.

I would have gone to bed when I was sick instead of pretending the earth would go into a holding pattern if I weren't there for the day.


I would never have bought anything just because it was practical, wouldn't show soil, or was guaranteed to last a lifetime.

Below in her own words are a few words describing her thirty years as a Conference Evangelist. Vera, two words are in order WELL DONE!

Romans 11:33 "O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are his judgments, and his ways past finding out!"

Little did I know when I made a trip to North Carolina that I would spend thirty-six years ministering in the North Carolina Conference of the Pentecostal Holiness Church. Thirty of those years I served as Conference Evangelist. Looking back at those years, the greatest and most rewarding years of my life, my soul breaks forth with spontaneous praise.

It was customary to book ten-day or two-week revivals in the 1970s. Many times we just could not close in two weeks. One such revival was at Thompson Chapel when Sister Lynette Mosley was pastoring there. The first Sunday night it seemed there was a special spot at the altar. Everybody that stepped into that special spot was touched in a special way by the Lord. People were waiting in line to get into that spot. The "laughing movement" had never been heard of at that time but we laughed and praised the Lord with everybody who was blessed that night.

In that same revival when the pulpit was given to me, I

would sing. When I began to sing the altar would fill. After several nights of this the people started saying, "Don't sing, we want to hear you preach." Those were blessed days.

The Statesville Church had scheduled me for a week-revival one year. At the end of that week the revival was doing so well we knew that it must continue. But, I was scheduled for a week in Virginia. So we just asked another evangelist to preach the second week. When I closed out in Virginia I came back and preached the third week. We saw the Lord do great things in those days.

December 5, 1972, I underwent surgery on my throat. The doctor promised that my voice would be normal when I recovered. But it was far from normal. I only had broken syllables and puffs of air when I tried to talk. My world seemed to fall in when on January 15, 1973, the doctor told me that I was a minister without a voice and would never preach again, not even with the aid of a microphone.

I left the hospital, went home and picked up the microphone to the tape recorder, and with broken syllables and puffs of air I recorded, "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee" Isaiah 26:3. Twenty-three days later, every day recording the same scripture, God gave me a new voice. How faithful and true our Lord is!

1985 was the year that the message on "Praise and Worship" struck like fire in my soul. It seemed to me that the entire Bible had to do with praise and worship. I preached it and wept over our people. We have missed so much through the years because of having a form of worship. Now it makes me so glad when I walk into the tabernacle or into one of our churches and the congregation enters into true worship.

In 1987 I experienced deliverance, and in turn started teaching and ministering deliverance to our people. I began to have more compassion for people because I understand why we have some of the problems we have. I understand why some people keep falling in the same place. I understand that iniquities can be passed down but sin cannot. I understand that trauma and loss can alter or damage our emotions. And Satan would have it that way so that you can't worship God as you did before unless you are set free and healed. If he can keep you from receiving the truth of deliverance, he can keep you bound and there is not any worship. Many have been set free and healed of hurts from the past.

"Spiritual Warfare" is the message of the hour. And it will continue to be the message for the remainder of this dispensation. I have studied it and taught it for ten years. I say with Paul, "We wrestle not against flesh and blood..."

(Eph. 6:12), and "the weapons of our warfare are not carnal..." (2 Cor. 10:4). We have mighty weapons through God. So let us pull down every high thing that exalts itself against God. And let us bring every thought to the obedience of Christ. As we learn the devices of Satan and we use our mighty weapons which God has given us to use, we will overcome Satan.

These have been good and wonderful years. Each church, each pastor and their family, hold a very special place in my heart. Thank you for allowing me to serve you.

Romans 10:15 "And how can they preach unless they are sent? As it is written, 'How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!' " (NIV)

FAITH COMMITMENT DAY

- 1. The purpose of Faith Commitment Day is to secure financial and prayer support for the missionaries.
- 2. Proper promotion should be carried out prior to Faith Commitment Day. You should emphasize the need for financial support for missionaries ...
 - From the pulpit
 - In the church bulletin
 - In other ways as desired
- 3. Obtain Faith Commitment cards and brochures from the conference missions director's office to distribute on Faith Commitment Day.
- 4. Pastor and local missions director, or representative, should attend the *Missions Meals* with ministers meeting in the conference to receive more information.
- 5. Plan a mission service on Faith Commitment Day
 - Invite a missionary
 - Preach a missions sermon
 - Use missions music
- 6. Distribute Faith Commitment cards to the people during the service.
 - Explain the concept of a Faith Commitment
 - Have a special missions prayer
 - Have the people fill out the cards listing prayer and the amount of monthly financial support for the missionary
 - Receive the Faith Commitment cards later in the service
 - Urge those who did not make a Faith Commitment to pray about it and turn in the card in the evening service
 - Announce the total committed to missionary support in this service, or in the evening service
- 7. Select a particular Sunday in the month and regularly receive the offering for missionary support on that day.

GOSPEL TABERNACLE HONORS PASTOR UPON RETIRING

The congregation of Gospel Tabernacle Church in Dunn gathered to honor its long-time pastor on Sunday evening, January 23, 2000. Pastor White retired from the pastorate. During what was called a "presentation ceremony," various church, political and community leaders thanked Pastor White for his service.

Among those was state Senator Oscar Harris, who, on behalf of Gov. Jim Hunt, presented Pastor White the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, the state's highest honor. Citing biblical admonitions to pray for government leaders, Sen Harris said, "I have felt his (Pastor White's) prayers on behalf of leadership. I have been blessed with my own great pastor, yet I still seek King's views and guidance." Sen. Harris said Pastor White helped him establish the Mayor's Prayer Breakfast while Mr. Harris served as mayor of Dunn.

In response to all those who praised him during the service, Pastor White said, "It has been my goal...to just love people and minister to their needs."

"I want my own family to remember me only as one who loved the Lord and showed them the light." Regarding the Gospel Tabernacle's future, he said, "I certainly believe the best ministry of this church is yet to be." Janice White, the pastor's wife, commented, "I appreciate all your love and friendship. Thank you for everything."

The Rev. Chris Thompson, assistant superintendent of the North Carolina Conference, said of Pastor White, "he is a servant leader...He's a man in touch with God. He knows how to follow God and encourages others to do the same." Rev. Thompson also gave greetings from T.E. Long, superintendent of the North Carolina Conference, who was not able to attend.

The Rev. Gabriel Tew, the church's associate pastor, read a letter of congratulations from the Bishop Rev. James Leggett, General Superintendent of the Pentecostal Holiness Church.

Mr. Archie Wood, a deacon of the church and one of its most active lay leaders, expressed appreciation to Pastor White on behalf of the church board. He presented Pastor and Mrs. White a framed painting by Christian artist Thomas Kinkade as well as a monetary gift from the church.

The Tabernacle's pastor-elect, Rev. Ron Wooten, who assumed his new role Feb. 1, also spoke. Rev. Ron Wooten earlier served as the Tabernacle's minister of music before he was called to the mission field in Kenya. He said it was difficult leaving

The Rev. Rose Boyd, the Gospel Tabernacle's former minister of Christian Education who currently serves in church missions, told the congregation, "many of you were saved under the ministry of Brother White." During funerals, the Rev. Boyd said, "there's just no comfort like the Holy Spirit that flows through this man." "I've never seen him condemn anybody," she said. "I've never heard him run down anybody else."

Mr. John Wellons, a lay leader in the church and one of the area's most influential business leaders, said of Pastor White, "He can speak and challenge you to become a better Christian." Dunn Mayor Abraham Oudeh also spoke, saying, "I believe in my heart every one of us were sent to Earth for a purpose and that Pastor White has served his church and community greatly." Mr. Hoover Adams, founder of *The Daily Record* and chairman of the Gen. William C. Lee Memorial Commission, thanked Pastor White for his community leadership. "The community never calls on him when he doesn't say yes." He said Pastor White has headed the Evening in the Park celebration during the Gen. Lee Weekend each of the 14 years it has been held. He also told the congregation, "You are going to let him retire, but we aren't." He said the Gen. Lee Commission is going to keep him working.



LINES FROM LINDA...

"Who will fill my shoes when I'm gone?" Recently I have given much thought to this. It is imperative that we prepare people to carry on God's work. Though we tend to take life for granted, it is really very fixed to the truth of the matter is that each of us is only

fragile. The truth of the matter is that each of us is only one breath away from eternity. When we face the sudden passing of a family member, friend or acquaintance, this fact is brought home to us. Our body is not designed to stay here forever, but only for a season. During that season, God has a plan and purpose for each of us to fulfill.

It is interesting to me how God puts those people in our paths who help us to develop into what we ultimately become. One such person in my life is Aunt Sallie Morris. She is not really my aunt, but I

have always felt that she is and addressed her as such. As a young child, she was my Sunday school teacher. I remember how she drilled us in the scripture verses and rewarded us as we memorized them. We needed furniture for the children's class... so she built it. That table and little stools, with cushioned tops (long before the days of cushioned pews), was used in that classroom for many years. It was Aunt Sallie who played the piano for church services. She was instrumental in starting Women's Ministries and Vacation Bible School. She was also the PHYS (Pentecostal Holiness Youth Society) director in our church. She wrote plays and skits, made costumes and scenery, and directed Sunday night youth productions on many occasions (not to mention the annual Christmas program).

Two of her best programs that I still remember well were *The Burial of Mrs. Gossip* and *The Three Hebrew Boys*. At the close of Mrs. Gossip's funeral (wooden casket and all), everyone was invited up front to view the corpse. When I looked into the casket, what a surprise! There was a huge mirror showing my own reflection. What a lesson to a young person! I have thought about that many times when I have been tempted to wag my tongue in the wrong direction. For *The Three Hebrew Boys*, she had a mock furnace with real flames. How emphatic it was for us to view the three young men coming out of those flames unharmed.

Not only was she creative in church work; she was also a great cook and homemaker. Yes, Aunt Sallie was my hero. But little did I realize that, in due time, I would have her mantle fall on me. As I grew up, she took me under her wing, nurtured me and coached me. She offered me opportunities to sharpen my skills and helped me through my blunders. Eventually it was I who was playing the piano and leading the youth work. Not only was she willing to train and help develop my gifts, but she was also willing to release me to do the work without trying to hold me in her control. She is 93 years old today and is still a spiritual warrior. She still attends almost every function of the church and is my chief cheerleader. I know I can never fill her shoes; but she has afforded me opportunities that have helped to make me who I am today. I will forever be grateful to her.

I realize, however, that I am getting on in years now, too. There are younger women who need the same nurture and guidance that I did. There are younger women who need to be offered the opportunities to develop their potential in the Lord's work. God always has someone waiting in the wings. At Holly Hill, I have seen a young woman emerge whom I believe God will use to help fill my shoes. Susan Bowers French grew up in the church. I have been blessed to play an active role in her spiritual development through the years. And now it is time

for us to release her to her own ministry. And the beauty of it is, that there is still a place for Aunt Sallie and a place for me.

That is what the Mary-Elizabeth Mentor Ministry of Women's Ministries is all about. We need those intergenerational experiences. As older women, we have much to offer in the way of experience; but we must realize that times and methods change. We must nurture and train our younger women and then release them to minister in their own ways. We must be there to bless and encourage them. After all, I want somebody prepared to fill my shoes!! Don't you?

GRACE FAMILY FELLOWSHIP HOSTS LEADERSHIP SEMINAR

The annual NCWM Leadership Seminar was held on February 5, after having to be postponed one week due to the snow. Over two hundred Women's Ministries leaders from various locations in the conference participated in the training.

The program began with Mrs. Debs Nall and Rev. & Mrs. James Gray leading in a season of Praise and Worship. Rev. Teresa Smith, who serves as Greenville District WM Director, gave a timely devotion on the need for spiritual development in leaders.

A skit titled *Our Best for the Master* was presented by the NCWM board members and members of the Grace Family Fellowship WM. The skit depicted a group of ladies attending a Women's Ministries meeting. The scenario switched back and forth from a well-prepared and efficient leader running an effective meeting to an unprepared and untrained leader trying to run a meeting. The message was loud and clear that quality leadership is the key to the success of the ministry of the local WM.

The feature of the training was Mr. Reece Gardner, certified Dale Carnegie trainer. Mr. Gardner led two sessions on Attitudes and Principles of Good Leadership. The training was interactive with audience participation. One portion of his training which the ladies particularly enjoyed was on relationships. He gave the following Nine Keys to Strengthening Relationships:

- 1. Don't criticize, condemn or complain.
- 2. Give honest, sincere appreciation.
- 3. Arouse in the other person an eager want.
- 4. Become genuinely interested in other people.
- 5. Smile
- Remember that a person's name is, to that person, the sweetest and most important sound in any language.
- Be a good listener. Encourage others to talk about themselves.
- 8. Talk in terms of other people's interests.
- 9. Make the other person feel important and do it sincerely.

OF SMALL GROUPS

Christianity Today calls it, "The Small Group Takeover." Princeton sociologist Robert Wuthnow describes it as "quiet revolution" happening across North America. Experts on church renewal usually link some form of small group vitality to the revivals and breakthrough churches they study.

This return to New Testament community has shown up with many different faces. It doesn't matter what one calls "social kinship units" as Peter Wagner describes them, but it does matter whether your church is experiencing their many benefits. God is at work using the small groups today. A church can experience positive transformation as one another's ministry ripples through the body of Christ.

All churches have small groups whether they know it or not. People relate and develop relationships with people like themselves. Small groups exist though they might not be organized or focused. People link their lives with believers or they will not stay within the church.

Small group ministry is tremendously important. People must and need to develop relationships within the body. Small groups allow and encourage this to happen. People are also allowed to discover their spiritual gifts and know they can use their God-given talents to minister within the body and through the church to touch the world.

Small group ministry is an option if people are to be cared for, nurtured, and equipped for ministry. There are several immediate benefits to be seen in small group ministry.

- Helps the church to be a community of committed, caring Christians learning how to love each other so the world will recognize Christ as the Messiah.
- Helps people discover and use their ministry gifts.
 People who sit passively in the worship service have the opportunity to discover and use their ministry gifts in a small group context. Then the group often encourages members to use their gifts in a larger context.
- Equips leadership for the congregation. In a relatively safe environment, the small group setting is a natural center for leadership development for the whole congregation.
- Makes faith personal. In a small group nominal Christians are drawn by the Spirit to come alive in faith.

- Provides the ideal setting for members to learn to trust and minister to each other. Members are more likely to witness outside the group if they have expressed their faith inside the group.
- Is the best way to assimilate new members. Small groups can be wonderful ministry groups. I even encourage our committees to function as caring communities while they do their tasks. (Roberta Hestenes Building Christian Community Through Small Groups)

Churches of the N.C. Conference need to make small group ministry a more intentional vehicle for ministry. In order to aid the process, Rev. David Wheeler, Conference Christian Education Director, and I will be conducting a series of Sunday School and Small Group Workshops. David will focus on Sunday school as an excellent opportunity for small group ministry. I will speak on the importance of small groups in general.

Each workshop will be two hours in length, from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. A question and answer time will follow with refreshments. Two hours of CEU credits may be earned by ministers. Workshops will be held in each district. Ministers, C.E. workers, church leadership, teachers, and others may attend the meetings. District cross-overs are certainly welcome. There is no registration fee.

FAITH COMMITMENT -A VEHICLE FOR REACHING OUR WORLD

The International Pentecostal Holiness Church presently has 161 missionaries in 87 different countries. Last year (1999) some 39 new missionaries were approved. One goal of World Missions Ministries is to have missionary presence in 100 countries before year's end. What is the vehicle and method to get missionaries in these countries? The answer is Faith Commitment giving.

March 5th is Faith Commitment Sunday and March is Faith Commitment month. Several missionaries are available in the Conference to take faith commitments at churches. They are Christie Baker, Roger and Mary Gorman, Mike and Jennifer Oliver, and Joe and Elsie Arthur.

Several scriptures speak of faith commitment giving. These are not printed for space's sake. These are Genesis 22:8, Luke 8:1–3, II Corinthians 8:3–5, and II Corinthians 9:7–8.

The first faith commitment offering in modern times was

probably organized by a Presbyterian minister. A.B. Simpson founded the Christian and Missionary Alliance denomination for world evangelization, and existed primarily to promote and support foreign missions.

To do so, Simpson had a missionary convention every year. Members were urged to designate a large percentage of their total giving to missions. The Alliance churches still do this. The offering is a commitment of what the people will trust God to enable them to do in the next twelve months. The Christian and Missionary churches have led the way in faith commitment.

Faith Commitment is an amount of money that you trust God to provide (usually monthly) through you for world missions. It is a step of faith that God will provide. It is a commitment between an individual and a missionary. Here individuals are identifying with the step of faith taken by the missionaries. It is a partnership with God to do His work.

Faith Commitment is not the tithe nor a church pledge that one owes the church budget. It is not a foolish commitment but rather a commitment based on communication with God. The commitment is not "look what I have done," but "behold what God has done!"

Benefits of signing a faith commitment card are several. The forms give the missions committee a basis for budget planning. People take a signed commitment seriously. A signature verifies a validity of a commitment, so the local missions committee does not count on a large amount from an unidentified source.

The primary means of raising missionary support and overall best way is the faith commitment plan. There are several reasons for this:

- It is biblical. It is a plan based on obedience and faith obedience to the Great Commission.
- 2) Missionaries represent the Body of Christ. It is the body that recognizes and affirms that a particular member is called to missions. Every Christian is part of the Body, but no one is the whole Body. Christians need each other.
- 3) Faith commitment giving is personal. People give to people.
- 4) Accountability is involved. Both the missionary and the donor are accountable. The missionary must carry his/her part of the load.
- 5) The outreach team grows. More individuals are won to Christ. As the Lord calls and supplies the need, the missionary staff grows.
- 6) The faith commitment process gives proof to the missionary call. It is the church that ultimately sends the missionary. Individual members respond as they sense the call of the missionary.

Faith commitment giving works! It is God's vehicle for sending forth missionaries.



• Unriddling Our Times: Reflections on the Gathering Cultural Crisis. Editor Os Guinness. Grand Rapids, MI: Baker Book House Company, 1999. 141 pages. \$8.99



Perhaps the greatest crisis Guinness seeks to emphasize the most is the crisis of truth. Life at the expense of truth is troubling and unpredictable to say the least. Truth that is essential as a basis for freedom and fulfillment can shake empires, but falsehood can lull a people such as the former Soviet Union into a destructive complacency. Are we in fact committing spiritual and moral suicide just as the Nazis and other nations and empires have done in the past? Is our modern condition as such that we are unable to detect all the lies and falsehood?

Men like Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn and Winston Churchill



are needed to expose the errors of our post-modern era. True prophets need to speak up concerning the manipulative practices that are having a deafening effect upon our culture. The pressure is on that would push us into accepting wrong as right and right as wrong. Christians have an obligation to Christ and the world to tell the truth. Guinness correctly stated, "If truth is dead and knowledge is power, then we are all vulnerable internally to passions and externally to manipulation." Like the proverbial frog in the kettle, it is possible to be manipulated into certain patterns of thought processes that are only remotely related to the reality and truth.

I highly recommend this book for laymen and ministers alike. It helped me tremendously in understanding our times and as to just how serious and critical the hour is in which we live. Indeed, the Christian faith remains the only living spiritual force capable of understanding and explaining pertinent current events as we approach the next advent of Christ's return. Perhaps the greatest riddle of all is why more Christians aren't shaken and disturbed by all that is happening in our world today. I have remained stirred in my heart and spirit to this day as a result of reading this publication.



THE REVITALIZATION OF THE LOCAL CHURCH

It is a fact that all of us must recognize that some churches die just as people die. Many capable authors have approached this subject in recent years to assist the Body of Christ in combating the eroding forces that threaten the life of a local assembly. Some who read this article may consider the word "dying" a wee bit strong to use in describing the condition of some churches. I do not mean to overemphasize the death of some churches, but it would be a misnomer to call some of them declining churches because they have been in a dying state for many years. The life of churches can be legendary because many of them have lived a long time and even "dying" ones can be virtually indestructible as long as there is a group of people who are committed to keeping that local body alive.

I use the word "dying" in some cases because the process that is at work in some of those churches seems as if it is not reversible. This condition is not necessarily the fault either of pastoral leaders or to the followers. The pastors, present and past of some of these, using a gentler word, declining churches, include some of the most intelligent, spiritual and committed pastors I have encountered. Their values and their interests are not wrong, and they are committed to maintaining the local church under their leadership with a basic hope and prayer that it will be reversed in its declining state. The church is more than an organization or an institution. The church is the carrier of the Gospel; the good news that God so loved that He sent His only Son to die on the cross and to be resurrected from the dead to guarantee the salvation of mortals as we submit to the saving and keeping grace. Sometimes it may be that churches become too institutionalized and begin the process of dying because they have become only religious and have turned away from the revelation of God in Jesus Christ and the work of God in the history of man. To those who are in this dreaded state it is

obvious that they have lost their grip upon the gospel, or as one writer put it, they've allowed the gospel to lose it's grip upon them. This reliance upon man-made institutions and self-imposed regulations can be a vicious substitute for the life-giving, Holy Spirit-anointed life of commitment to the gospel of Jesus Christ. Of course, no one wants to be noted to be merely religious and not truly, biblically spiritual.

In the latter years of the 1960s a matter occurred in this country that has set the stage for the decline of many churches. For the first time in United States history many of the major church bodies ceased growing and began to obviously decline. Now and in the future we may be able to see that this was one of the most significant turnabouts of the twentieth century. At least, according to my studies, ten of the largest Christian denominations of this country whose membership totaled some seventy-eight million persons in 1967 for the first time had fewer members the next year and fewer yet the year after that. Most of these denominations had been growing uninterruptedly since the early days of this country. In the previous decade they had grown more slowly with many of them failing to stay up with the increase in our nation's population, percentage-wise. In diminishing they reversed a trend that had been marching forward for some two hundred years.

Some observers contend that churches are declining because they are not relevant to the needs of this day. To them, to become more relevant would be to be more involved and show greater interest in social adjustments and engage in many or at least some of the social actions and welfare projects. Still some others would argue that to do so would impair the witness and hasten the decline of the local church by blending into one ecumenical union with those around us. Some of the other remedies that have been offered have merit. The remedy may not be the same for each local church who is declining, but it may be that some of these are applicable to a given situation. If your church local assembly, dear reader, is in that declining posture, may I encourage you to influence your local constituency to look at these possibilities again. Some of them will fit your situation and some will not. All of us must conclude that none of them will work appropriately and effectively until the element that is killing your local church has been identified and dealt with.

Some are saying that more time and resources designated for the religious education training of our people is the answer. To others they would simply call for a radical return to a more literal presentation of biblical facts and truths. Others need to take a strong look at whether or not they have

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been caught up in that Ephesian trait of having lost their first love. When the church becomes more in love with itself and more proud of its facilities and other attributes than it is of the presence and power of God in our midst, then certainly that church has lost it's first love. Please keep in mind that church buildings and other facilities of the church of an inanimate nature do neither have the ability to love or to lose love. The church can be revived and revitalized by the people in that church taking a good strong look at their love relationship of the Lord Jesus Christ. There are some churches that are dying or will die because they have left out the cultivation of an awareness of the Holy Spirit's presence. They have put brakes on the manifestation gifts and deemphasized the prayer of faith for the healing of our people. A revival of submission to the presence and power of the Holy Spirit in our midst is absolutely necessary.

Another remedy for some churches who are caught in the throes of the death strangle is a stronger program of biblical stewardship. Some churches are losing their ability to

minister effectively because their constituency have become greedy and stolen the Lord's tithes and no longer bring Him offerings of a freewill nature. The church leadership in turn, puts the squeeze on tithing and giving beyond itself. That process shuts up the windows of Heaven and many blessings are withheld because of this introverted stance. This must be reversed by adopting a spirit of liberality to prevail. Praise God, this is happening in many local churches.

Some churches are telling us that the way to exit the inevitable death that awaits the local church is to bring our liturgy and style of worship into a more contemporary activity and to fill the agenda of the worship service with a broader use of the arts. This may be a legitimate revitalization tool for some churches. However, it must always be kept in mind that any use of the arts is to be totally in line with biblical principles. The performance of the arts must never be simply for the gratifying of the mind but for the edifying of the spirit.

Some have suggested that the church will cease it's decline when there is a new revival of great preaching. What is great preaching? Is great preaching some animated physical and verbal display? Or is it strict adherence to the teaching of the Word of God in a powerfully anointed presentation? Whatever great preaching is, and it certainly can be described in various ways, it must always exalt the Lord Jesus Christ and He alone must be exalted.

Others have suggested that new methods and new media avenues of evangelism must be explored. This is probably one of the strongest arguments to be presented as an approach to turning the church around for the glory of God. Too many are too afraid of what they view as untried and unproven methods of evangelism. We must reach the lost at any cost and at any sacrifice, using whatever means are biblically endorsed.

Others have suggested that we need better and more professional pastoral counseling. This probably would help us a lot in many areas. Certainly every pastor needs to be a good listener and know how to give sound advice in keeping with the principles of God's holy word.

Some of the other suggestions include identification with reaching out to the oppressed minorities whether these be racial or social minorities.

One suggestion that I find in reading various pieces of literature is a suggestion that we experience a greater identification with the youth culture of our day and bring our church activities more in harmony with such. This certainly is a good thing to look at, and I believe that after we have investigated it thoroughly we can honestly say that we probably do need to make more of our activities relevant to the needs of young people, because they are not only the church of tomorrow, they are a very important part of the church of today. However, let me hasten to say we must not weaken the gospel nor the doctrinal tenents that have brought us thus far under God. To violate these direct biblical truths would further hasten declension and the eventual demise of the local church.

THAT PARTICULAR POSTURE. IN FACT CHURCHES TODAY THAT ARE KNOWN TO BE "MORE CONSERVATIVE" ARE EXPERIENCING THE GREATEST GROWTH. WHILE MANY OF THE "MAINLINE" PROTESTANT DENOMINATIONS ARE TRYING TO SURVIVE WHAT THEY HOPE WILL BE BUT A TEMPORARY REVERSAL, OTHER DENOMINATIONS ARE OVERFLOWING WITH

TREMENDOUS GROWTH, SUCH AS THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION, THE ASSEMBLIES OF GOD, THE CHURCHES OF GOD AND MANY MORE PENTECOSTAL AND HOLINESS GROUPS SUCH AS THE INTERNATIONAL PENTECOSTAL HOLINESS CHURCH. EVANGELICALS ARE STILL EXPERIENCING TREMENDOUS IMPACT EFFECTIVENESS AROUND THE WORLD.

Some of the reasons for this tremendous growth is the commitment of the vast majority of the people of those mentioned in the previous paragraph to sacrifice status, safety, possessions, and even life itself for the cause of Christ and for the future of the church. Another factor is the vast majority of people involved in conservative churches have a willingness to obey the disciplines of the Bible and a willingness to suffer if needs be for the cause of Christ and the good of the church. Another factor that has enveloped this more effective group of believers is an eagerness to tell the good news of the individual's own experience of salvation to other people, including a refusal to be silenced by critics and those who are ashamed of our testimony. In addition many of these in the conservative element of the body of Christ have a winsomeness that adorns them because of the presence and power of the Holy Spirit living in their lives.

Let me emphatically declare that your local church never has to have the identifying marks of a dying congregation, but your local church can be one of dynamic spiritual emphasis and commitment to the total word of the Living God. To God be glory, His Church is alive and well!

Harry Ray Ward was born in Columbus County, North Carolina, November 19, 1934. Ray was the youngest of four children born to the Wards, who made their living by the "sweat of their brow" by farming and digging wells. Mr. and Mrs. Ward instilled in their children early on the value of honest, productive work, as all of them participated in the business of making a living for the family.

As the value of work was instilled in the children, so was the value of attending church. Mr. and Mrs. Ward were devout Christians and sought to expose their four children to as much church-going as possible. It was in these early days of life that Ray, as was the case with the other children, learned about God and His love.

Ray grew up in a small community called "Vinegar Hill" and attended Tabor City High School. He was a star player

on the Tabor City Red Devils football team, playing center. He made exceptionally good grades in school and completed all course requirements for graduation a full year ahead of schedule.

In 1952, Ray met Miss Leota Bryant. She was a bright, vibrant, and beautiful young lady. After only six weeks of courtship Ray and Leota were married on November 26, 1952, in Conway, S.C. Though the courtship was short, the bond of love between them never wavered or weakened, and was stronger than ever after 47 years of marriage.

In the 1950s Hixton, Dalton and Ray moved to the Raleigh area and went into construction business. As time passed, they organized separate businesses and all were very successful. All of the brothers attended the Emmanuel Pentecostal Holiness Church in Raleigh where Rev. J. Doner Lee was pastor. In a revival meeting conducted by Evangelist Clayton Guthrie, Ray gave his heart to the Lord. In fact, he was saved, sanctified and baptized in the Holy spirit all in the same service. In the years to follow, he devoted himself to much study and learning about his Lord. Though happy in the building trade, Ray seemed to have a certain restlessness about him. The building business was doing good and he had no formal education for the ministry, just lots of questions to deal with. But, he knew that he must obey the Lord's calling, and so he did. With the call of God burning in his heart he joined the North Carolina Conference of the Pentecostal Holiness church in 1967. Since then he has pastored six churches, some of them more than once. He pastored over a period of 31 years, during which time he built a beautiful new church and parsonage in Warrenton, a parsonage in Williamston, and another parsonage in Smithfield. His churches always showed progress spiritually and numerically. He was a good shepherd.

His homegoing on Friday, December 10th, marked an end to his earthly life with all its pain and sorrows, for he had suffered much. But it was the beginning of a new life of joy and everlasting peace. His labors are now complete! He has heard his Master say, "Welcome, thou good and faithful servant. You have fought a good fight, you have won the race." We rejoice! FOR HE IS HOME AT LAST!


SPECIAL PICTURES

LINES FROM LINDA...

During this Lent season, I am enjoying a devotional guide titled Journey To The Cross. This morning I revisited John 11 where I reviewed the account of the resurrection of Lazarus. As I read the scripture, I was reminded that Jesus knew why Lazarus had died. It was time for a miracle. It was time for Him to prove His authority. If you notice, Jesus didn't rush right over to take care of the situation the very moment He got the news of Lazarus' death. He lingered two days. He knew there were scoffers who would doubt his resurrecting power, so He gave plenty of time for everyone to know that Lazarus was DEAD! Then, at the right moment, Jesus announced that He was going to Judea to "awaken" Lazarus. By the time He arrived, Lazarus had been dead for four days. He was already in the grave.

As Jesus approached the home of Lazarus, his sister, Martha, ran to meet him. In great frustration, she cried out, "If you had been here, my brother would not have died." This almost sounds accusatory; however, faith rose within her, and she said, "I know it's not too late, because whatever you ask of God, He will do." As a response to her statement of faith, Jesus answered her with the promise that her brother would live again.

Martha said, "I know he will live again in the resurrection at the last day." It seems that Martha believed for the future but had doubts about the here and now. Jesus didn't leave much time for that doubt to prevail. He answered her, "I AM THE RESURRECTION... Do you believe this?" Her response affirmed her faith in Jesus as the Son of God.

But Lazarus didn't burst forth from the grave at that moment and rush on the scene. Jesus had not yet dealt with Lazarus' other sister, Mary. When she realized He was there, she also went out to greet him. Grief-stricken and weeping, she fell at Jesus' feet with the same concern as her sister Martha. "If you had been here, my brother would not have died." Unlike Martha, Mary did not go on to express any other expectations of Jesus. Instead she and her friends continued to weep. It was at that point that Jesus wept!

Why did Jesus weep? Not for Lazarus, for he already knew that Lazarus would not stay in the grave. Did he weep because Mary was weeping...to show human compassion? I wonder, for he could have just told her what he knew and brought laughter to her. Was there a more compelling reason for his tears? You will note that Mary did not make any statement of expectation of Jesus. She simply continued to weep, focusing on the fact that Lazarus was dead. Could it have been that Jesus wept because, in the midst of Mary's sorrow and despair, she had forgotten Who He was. She had failed to recognize the answer to her problems was at hand. As Mary's friends went on to accuse Jesus of letting Lazarus die, He groaned.

It was time for action. He commanded the stone to be rolled away from the grave entrance. Again doubt arose in Martha, and she expressed concern that her brother had already been dead four days and would have an offensive odor by now. Jesus reminded her, "If you will believe, you will see the glory of God." With a voice of great authority, Jesus cried out, "Lazarus, come forth." At that moment, Lazarus arose. Lazarus was alive and well. Jesus had once again proved that He was the Son of God.

I related to this lesson as I read it this morning. In some distressful times of my life, when Jesus came on the scene, I have been like Martha. I have expressed frustration and exhibited doubt but still looked to Him in faith. On the other hand, there have also been times when I have been much like Mary. In the midst of sorrow or hurt, I have failed to acknowledge who Jesus is. I have continued to mourn, thus causing friends to mourn with me. How I must have sorrowed the heart of Jesus by not trusting in Him to meet my need. Perhaps I, too, have caused Jesus to weep.

Like the stone that separated Jesus from Lazarus, there is sometimes a barrier that separates me from the miracle. Jesus could have rolled that stone away himself, but he called on the people to do that. Is that significant? I believe so! We have a responsibility to get rid of the barrier that separates us from the mighty power of God. As we celebrate Easter, the season of resurrection, may we take action to roll away the stone that separates us from the miracle working power of God. May we all truly believe and sing the refrain:

"HIS RESURRECTION POWER

IS MOVING IN THIS HOUR THAT JESUS MIGHT BE GLORIFIED"


LOOKING AHEAD...

EVERY CHURCH NEEDS FOUR PULPITS by Owen Weston

It is evident that the Great Commission of Matthew 28:19–20 mandates a global view of evangelism. "To go into all the world" must include starting at the home church neighborhood, reaching the surrounding neighborhoods and conquering the city, the county, the country, and all the earth. For too long the focus has been (1) the mother church and (2) the ends of the earth and *not* the places in between.

Acts 1:8 makes it very clear that the church needs to have 4 pulpits. *USA Today* reported that church attendance in America in 1998 was the lowest it has ever been in the history of this country. It has dropped to 36% compared to 38% a few years ago and 40% in 1987. Meanwhile, Dr. Barrett reports in the *Encyclopedia of Religion* that Christianity is increasing in places like Africa, which is now 40% Christian and so on. The largest Christian churches in the world are not in "Christian America," but in the countries where America has been sending missionaries: Seoul, Korea; South America; and Africa.

Why is Christianity growing in the rest of the world but declining in the USA? As always there is never just one answer. Christianity was once dominant in the Middle East and North Africa, but then it all but disappeared from that region. It was evident in Asia Minor as the seven churches in Revelation indicate, but today all that remains are ruins. This same scenario can be seen in Europe and England. Now it is happening in America.

What causes this reoccurring pattern? James Montgomery in his book, Dawn 2000, may offer the best answer. He makes the case that the church throughout history has failed to carry out the "Acts 1:8 mandate." Acts 1:8 says, "After that the Holy Spirit comes upon you, you shall receive power to witness in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the ends of the earth." Montgomery suggests this verse is not simply a summation of the missionary work recorded in Acts as most New Testament scholars propose, but that this scripture should be the model for New Testament evangelism strategy. In Acts 1:8 Jerusalem was the home city or base for the New Testament church begun at Pentecost. Judea is the province in which Jerusalem was located. Samaria is the anti-Jewish, the "unclean," area close to Judea where no good Jew dared to venture. Even Jesus' going through Samaria concerned his disciples, especially when he stopped to speak to the prostitute. The "ends of the earth" is self-explanatory.

Montgomery says this scripture should give the model. The local church is Jerusalem, the mother church, and it needs to focus on four evangelistic prongs. It should build up itself, Jerusalem. It should branch out to Judea, the mother church's surrounding community. Samaria is the mother church's evangelistic witness into the "unclean," prostitute-filled, unacceptable, nearby communities. And fourth, the "ends of the earth" is the witness the mother church propagates into

foreign fields. This means that each church should have four pulpits and outreach points in its strategy to conquer the world for Christ: its Jerusalem, its Judea, its Samaria, and its foreign fields.

America was once the missionary ground for Europe's Christian churches. America then became the strong Christian base when these European churches lost their local power and died evangelistically. America has followed the same pattern of Christianity in Asia Minor, Europe and England. It, too, has sent missionaries to Africa, Korea, and South America, and similarly, the local church has died while the foreign church starts to carry the banner.

However, it is not too late for America. We can learn from history. If America would do as Montgomery suggests, and if each church in America incorporates an Acts 1:8 mandate, Christianity in America will not die as it has in other countries. The local church needs to concentrate not only on building itself up and focusing on foreign missions. The church should also include planting other churches in the surrounding areas, its Judea. What this means is that when the mother church (Jerusalem) dies, other churches it has started will duplicate the mother church's evangelistic thrust in that area. If this continues, the mother church's evangelistic thrust never disappears from the local city or country, but continues on simultaneously with the evangelistic growth taking place with its foreign missions.

If this four-fold program and evangelistic thrust, as modeled in Acts 1:8, is carried out by churches in America, we will never lose our evangelistic thrust of America and we will continue to affect our world wherever we send foreign missions dollars and people. The future of our gospel message depends on this, and so does Christianity in America.

Looking at the example in the New Testament, it becomes evident that the Jerusalem church was in no way content to be localized in Jerusalem. Admittedly, the dispersion of the Jews helped to plant churches all around the Middle East and beyond. But, nowhere do we find Jerusalem disparaging the starting of the new church.

In Acts 13, we have one of the most powerful examples of a mother church starting daughter churches in the surrounding area. The interesting event of Acts 13 was that the two senior pastors, Barnabas and Paul, were the very ones that were asked to leave the mother church and go and start the daughter church.

It becomes clear as one continues to read Acts that a whole team of people left the mother church to be involved in such a church plant endeavor.

Another interesting fact about the church in Acts 13 was that it was started by *lay people*, and when Jerusalem heard that a church had been started in Antioch, they sent the pastor, Barnabas, to go and oversee them (Acts 11:19–24).

THE FUTURE OF SUNDAY SCHOOL

Regarding the church, Jesus said three things: (1) it is His church; (2) He will build it; and (3) hell will not defeat

it! (Matthew 16:18) Nowhere are we authorized to build churches ourselves except as part of our strategy in carrying out the Great Commission. Matthew 28:19-20 makes it plain what we are to be spending our t i m e a n d resources doing: winning, assimilating, and discipling.

These are the

works of the Sunday School, also. It stands to reason that a Great Commission Sunday School will be accomplishing Great Commission purposes. If your Sunday School is not accomplishing these goals, Author Ken Hemphill in his book Revitalizing the Sunday Morning Dinosaur, makes several assertions as to why this might be so.

He first lists *loss of evangelistic focus* as a prime cause. Few modern day Sunday Schools have a clearly defined evangelistic strategy or focus. If you analyze most classes, you would find that fellowship was more a factor than evangelism or systematic study of the Bible.

Second is *loss of emphasis and commitment*. As the evangelistic focus was lost, the excitement was lost, and when excitement waned, many pastors and church leaders lost their enthusiasm for Sunday School. Many "with-it" modern churches say that Sunday School is dead, and have replaced it with some other type of Small Group ministry. Yet, statistics show that "old-fashioned" Sunday School has the potential to reach *two*

to three times as many people as many other "Small Groups" ministries—if it is properly structured and promoted.

Third, he lists *loss of vision for the total work of the Sunday School.* A properly functioning Sunday School class will achieve the three Great Commission goals. A well-structured Sunday School class will maintain a balanced commitment to the overall work of the church.

Fourth, there is often a *lack of a clear sense of purpose*. Every church ought to look at each of its activities and ask the question, "Why are we doing this?" If there is not a reason that clearly relates to the Great Commission in general, and the Mission of that church in specific, it may be time to re-evaluate the effectiveness of that activity.

Fifth is *fear of innovation*. Many people have an automatic fear of anything new, of "changing things." But we see that everything *outside* the church is changing, whether we like it or not. A church that is afraid of change will not effectively minister to today's world! We have the task of carrying an *unchanging* gospel to an *ever-changing* world.

In conclusion, let me say that Sunday School can and

should be an integral part of the growth strategy of a r e a t Commission church. When Brother Thompson and I visit your district this spring, we will be showing ways you to structure your ministries to help your church accomplish this end.



 A New Beginning For Pastors and Congregations. By Kennon Callahan, San Francisco: Jossey-Bass Publishers, 1999.228 pp. \$22.00

Once again Callahan has written a thorough and thoughtprovoking book on a new beginning for pastors and congregations, designed to help the young or veteran pastor gain new insights as to how to begin well in a new pastorate, or in a situation that did not have a good beginning and needs a jump-start to aid the pastorcongregation relationship by capitalizing on each other's shared gifts and strengths. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable table for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction [discipline] in righteousness." 2 Timothy 3:16

The Editor's Apology

Herewith we present to you the fourth edition of the Discipline of the Pentecostal Holiness Church published since the union of 1911, in which union The Fire-Baptized Holiness Church and the Pentecostal Holiness Church were made one. The first edition of said Discipline was printed in 1911; the second, in 1913; the third, 1917, and the fourth edition is issued in 1921.

During each quadrennium it is clearly seen that there are deficiencies and conflicts in our Discipline, and so each General Conference must make such changes, subtractions, and additions as it sees proper. These changes will continue to be made as long as we are an organization. In fact, the most important business of any General Conference is to make such changes. If any General Conference ever fails to make changes in the Discipline, it will indicate that the life and work of this church is waning. If we keep pace with God, we must progress, we will be forced to change our regulations to meet the demand of the day. So each General Conference will make its changes in the Discipline.

It is impossible for the law-making body of any organization to make at one time all laws necessary for the future. Our national and state legislatures are continually making new laws and revising the old ones. The church must do the same. Also our national and state legislative bodies find it impossible to avoid certain conflicts of their laws. These conflicts are not seen at the time the law is made; if they were, they would be eliminated. It is left with the judicial branch of the government to interpret these laws, and to adjust the conflicts. In like manner, you may find some conflicts in this edition of our discipline; but I was not the purpose of the members of our General Conference to have it so, neither was it in the purpose of the committee men who drafted the most of the changes and editions. Just the opposite was the aid of all concerned.

Inasmuch as I was chairman of the Disciplinary Committee, I can say that it was not the purpose of the Committee to enact a law that would prevent any person in the church filling an office or performing a service to which God and the church would call him. We endeavored to arrange all matters of membership in such a way that any and all persons could serve in any capacity that should be desired of them; and yet we sought to avoid conflicts in authority by forbidding any one person to hold full membership in any two bodies, etc., if they should find a conflict in the Discipline, to endeavor to interpret according to the spirit rather than the letter of the law. "The letter killeth but the spirit giveth life."

WORLD MISSIONS HOMES

The North Carolina Conference is blessed with three homes that are used extensively for itinerating missionaries. They are the Mollie Culbreth Evans Home in Falcon, the J. H. King/A. E. Robinson Home in Falcon, and the Jackie Wilson Home in Clinton. Two of the homes are privately owned (King and Wilson). The Evans home is owned by World Missions Ministries in Oklahoma City, but managed by the N.C. Conference Missions Ministries.

These homes have been a real blessing to itinerating missionaries and those on furlough. The homes are completely furnished (that means everything even dishes, towels, etc.). They are offered to missionaries rent free. The missionaries are responsible for the utilities.

The homes are nearly always occupied. Presently the homes have these occupants:

- Evans Home Ron & Sharon Wooten (moving shortly)
- •King-Robinson Home Mike & Jennifer Oliver
- Wilson Home Ron and Phyllis Roy

Later this year, Steve and Betsie Cofer and Linwood and Nancy Berry will be using two of the homes. The Olivers will be here until late this year.

Funds are being raised now for the annual operation of the homes. In between missionaries, there are utility cots for all of the homes. Repair work is done for the King-Robinson and Wilson homes by owners. Praise the Lord! Funds have to be raised for repair to the Evans home. The annual operational budget needed is a minimum of \$2,500.00.

Presently several thousand dollars (\$5,000.00 to \$7,000.00) is needed to finish a storage building, new carpet, and refinish the kitchen cabinets at the Evans home. This is much needed work but can only be done as funds are available.



CHURCH NEWS



Rev. John R. Stead

John R. Stead, missionary, joined the North Carolina Conference in 1965. He and his dear wife, Gladys, served this Church and our Lord in a commendable manner throughout their years. I praise the Lord for giving them to us to co-labor in ministry. Brother Stead is now at home with our Lord. The following paragraphs are excerpts from his eulogy.

WHITE ZULU

J. R. "Jack" Stead

Jack, as he was affectionately called, was born and raised on a farm in Thornville Junction, Natal. Growing up on the farm, he learned to speak Zulu as fluently as he spoke English. This knowledge acquired as a young boy ideally equipped him for his missionary activity and earned him the affectionate title of "White Zulu."

At school, Jack studied accounting, and during the Depression took the only job he could find in a remote African reserve working for a trading store. The Afrikaans manager was a devout Pentecostal Christian who had a great burden to see the black people saved. Here Jack learned to love the black people and would accompany this manager on missionary trips, often at night carrying a paraffin lantern.

He was eventually inducted as a pastor of a small church in a very poor area of town. The war interrupted Jack's missionary work. Before leaving for active service in 1940, he married Gladys, his lifelong helpmeet and sweetheart.

On his return from service, he found that the black church had joined the Pentecostal Holiness mission, and after studying their doctrines, joined them, and he and Gladys were appointed missionaries in 1945. When a young man took over the white church, Jack was free to serve full time. Opportunities opened up for Mozambique to Capetown with Zulu, Xhosa, Indian, and mixed race people added to the church. There was a great need for church buildings. Jack either built, or helped to build, fourteen church buildings and three parsonages. He had to trust God for the finances and learned not to limit God. These were busy years for the Steads, and God used them to help establish the work in Africa.

The Steads retired from active missionary status on October 1, 1977. When he retired, he was carried to the church on a motor cavalcade through the streets of KwaMashu with even the heathen men calling out "Bayete Nkosi" (Hail to the Chief). His brother noted this was the only time he had ever heard this royal title being given to a white man. What a send off!

The Steads retired to New Zealand and remained active in their local church. He also felt the Lord had called him into a ministry of prayer. For many years, he rose at 2:00 or 3:00 in the morning to pray until breakfast. He interceded for his family, the missionaries, the local church; his life was endless.

He had been in poor health for some time and was staying in a hospice. Jack Stead was called home on March 2, 2000. His faithful wife, Gladys, and three children survive him: Joan, Ivan, and Merrill.

Bro. Stead's son-in-law, John, gave the following testimony of Brother Stead's departure into the throne room of heaven:

"Jack passed into the immediate presence of his Lord, and this mortal put on immortality. Suffering has ended and glory has begun. Dad had not been able to speak for some days, but yesterday, he startled us by shouting out 'Hallelujah' – his last word."

What a welcome he must have had in glory – all the African brethren who had gone before, the hosts of heaven, and best of all the Master's "Well done, you good and faithful servant. Enter into the joy of your Lord!"

LINES FROM LINDA...

The words from a song I learned in high school glee club come to mind today.

"No man is an island, No man stands alone,

Each man's joy is joy to me, Each man's grief is my own

We need one another, so I will defend

Each man as my brother each man as my friend."

That's been forty years ago, but many times these words have risen up in my spirit.

I recently counseled with someone who, after pouring her heart out to me, told me that she didn't have a single friend she could talk to about a very serious situation in her life. She admitted that because of a past experience of a friend betraying her confidence, she had withdrawn herself from sharing with people. When she made that statement, I saw an island...I saw a woman standing alone. Perhaps she could have shared her joy with someone, but there was no friend available to her to share in her grief. As a result of this, she was on the verge of a nervous breakdown.

I never rememoer being without friends. As a child, my first cousin was my bosom buddy. We shared everything...nothing held back! She is still my friend today. When I started school, my friendships expanded. Some of my classmates are still my close friends and confidentes. In college, my world enlarged even more; and I was blessed to add more friendships. Over the years, through my church work and public life, my roster of friends has grown tremendously.

One friend in particular is my WM Director, Joy Bowers. Joy came to our community to teach in the late '60s. She won the heart of the school principal, and they married. Having grown up in the Greenville First Pentecostal Holiness Church, she and Richard started attending Holly Hill when they moved to Vanceboro. Immediately, Joy became my friend. Through the years since then, she has been my prayer partner. It's amazing how many times we can almost know what is going on with one another without a word spoken.

For many years, our Women's Ministries has participated in the Sharing Sister program. (Anyone remember when it was Secret Pal?) Each year in December we draw names to assign ourselves a Sharing Sister. Throughout the year, we make an effort to spend time together, to share and to remember special events in our lives. But we also commit to pray for each other as well.

Several of the ladies who have been my sharing sisters over the years are now in Heaven. One now lives in Connecticut. Some are still active at Holly Hill. But all of them hold special places in my heart...Because I have had

an opportunity to share in their lives.

If your WM doesn't practice the Sharing Sister concept, encourage them to do so. You'll be blessed with the results. After all, NO WOMAN IS AN ISLAND. No woman should have to stand alone. It is not healthy for any of us to live unto ourselves. We must share in the joys and help bear the grief of each other.

What a beautiful world it would be if the Sharing Sister concept prevailed!

Five churches were represented at the District Women's Ministries Rally held on April 14, 2000, at Glad Tidings Church in Morehead City, NC. After a stirring

time of corporate praise and worship, a women's trio blessed us with two selections which reminded us of Christ's life, ministry, death, burial, resurrection, ascension, and soon return.

Mrs. Sylvia Ward from Tarboro, NC, was the guest speaker. In her message, "Going the Extra Mile," Mrs. Ward presented several steps to consider that would make our own day-to-day ministries more effective. First, she instructed us to "STOP in the

name of the Lord and seek His face" as great patriarchs, such as Noah and Abraham, did. Second, she encouraged us to "LOOK into God's Word for direction" as we prepared to enter the fields that are white with harvest — the awaiting harvest of the souls of men. Next, she admonished us to "LISTEN to the voice of the Holy Spirit" for instructions as to God's will for us in ministry. Last, she advised us to "GO wherever and whenever God instructed us" — always portraying the love of Jesus in every situation.

Mrs. Ward also reminded us, as women, where our priorities in ministry should be. Our first priority should be the worship of our Creator. Our second priority should be seeing to the needs of those in our own homes and families. Our third priority should be a loving and supporting ministry to those in our communities. Mrs. Ward expounded further by helping us to see that our day-to-day ministering could involve some quite simple acts, such as:

A thinking-of-you card sent to a discouraged Christian,

an afternoon visit to sit with a sick friend, taking an elderly person to the grocery story, baking an extra pie for someone, or giving an extra dollar to a helpful waitress. Mrs. Ward said that we might not all be called to some foreign mission field, but we are all "laborers together with Christ" and need to be faithful wherever we serve. Her final challenging question was, "If you were accused of being a Christian, would there be enough evidence to convict you?"

Mrs. Ward's message was an especially appropriate pre-Easter message in that we were all reminded that Jesus, the crucified Savior, was willing to go the extra mile for fallen man. Subsequently, we asked ourselves if we were willing to go the extra mile for our fellow man.

From the first stanza of "Just As I Am, Without One Plea" to the last admonition to "go the extra mile 'til Jesus comes," the evening was filled with an unforgettable spirit of worship, an air of introspection, and the stirring call to serve others where we are — "going the extra mile."



STRAWBERRY PUDDING IS YUMMY ...

One special bonus in the role of NCWM Director is to get to visit in so many of the churches for WM Days, rallies and such where our women serve the most delicious dishes. 1 quart strawberries

½ cup sugar

1 small package Strawberry Jello

Mix and heat (on low heat) above ingredients long enough for sugar to melt. Let sit until cool. Drain.

2 small packages vanilla instant pudding

3 cups milk

1 cup sour cream

% of large container of Cool Whip

Mix pudding & milk. Fold in sour cream and Cool Whip. Layer vanilla wafers, pudding mixture & drained strawberries. Layer again and top with remainder of Cool Whip. Keep refrigerated until time to serve.

N. C. Conference Evangelists' Criteria

- 1. The evangelist shall be an ordained member of the N.C. Conference in good standing.
- 2. The evangelist shall consider his primary occupation as that of "full time evangelist."
- 3. The evangelist shalt conduct at least twenty-six revivals per year 13 of which shall be within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference.
- 4. The evangelist shall report in a manner as directed by the Director and Evangelism Board.
- 5. The evangelist must be approved by the North Carolina Evangelism Board
- 6. The evangelist shall submit a written revival schedule each quarter in advance to the Director.
- 7. The evangelist must present the ministries of the Conference in a positive manner to the churches.
- 8. The evangelist must have been a member of the Conference for at least one year before application can be made.

2000 GLOBAL OUTREACH OFFERING

Progress is being made in receiving the 2000 Global Outreach Offering. Coin folders and Day's Wage folders have been distributed. Prayers have been offered. Pastors, local missions directors, and committee members are working to challenge each local church. Goals are in place. May they be reached!

The N.C. Conference goal is \$235,000.00. A miracle goal of \$250,000.00 has also been set. One hundred years ago at the beginning of Falcon Camp Meeting, a World Evangelism offering of \$250.00 was given by J. A. Culbreth, the founder of the camp meeting. It just seems right that one hundred years later that as the conference begins a second century, the offering should be **TWO HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND.**

"You are the Key" Key rings are being offered to each adult who gives a Day's Wage and to each child who fills at least two coin folders. The key chains are available at the Conference Office. Contact Secretary Rose Nelson.

The "GO" Offering is a crucial offering for the expansion of world missions and the planting of new churches. 75% goes to World Missions and 25% to Evangelism USA. Funds are used for promotion costs, Antioch grants, missionary deficits, special projects, and church planting in the U.S.A.

2000 PROJECT ANTIOCH GRANTS

Addis Ahaba, Ethiopia

Funds will help purchase land or a building to use as a worship center and the government required headquarters. Being in the capital city will give us access to all the tribes who are living and working there.

Brussels, Belgium

Capital of Europe - now experiencing revival. We are in the process of purchasing a building that will seat 1,000. Funds will help with the down payment, notary fees, and expenses for obtaining proper zoning.

Guatemala City, Guatemala

Funds will purchase a building with adequate space for worship, congregational growth, a training center, and offices.

Perth, Australia

Funds will be made available toward the purchase and development of a facility which will accommodate several facets of ministry.

The Evangelism USA projects are: Chicago, Illinois New York City, New York Washington, D.C. Los Angeles, California

The annual "GO" Offering Sunday is July 9. This is a special day designated for prayer for World Evangelism. It is the target Sunday to complete receiving the 2000 offering. (If this is not a convenient Sunday, then July 16 is an alternate Sunday).

All funds are requested to be in the Conference office by Tuesday, July 18. This allows for the printing of the bulletin for the Camp Meeting World Evangelism Service, July 23. Our hope and prayer is to celebrate victory in that service. The ultimate goal is 100% participation from each church. (Churches that will not be able to collect their funds by July 23 should send in their pledge amounts.)



From the Superintendent

Dr. R. M. Stewart Memorial Library

I have had a deep love and respect for Reverend R. M. Stewart for many years. I first remember him and his lovely wife Annie Laura from their early days in the pastorate at Mill Street Pentecostal Freewill Baptist Church in Rocky Mount. I was a teenager beginning in ministry at what was then the First Pentecostal Holiness Church of Rocky Mount, (now Living Faith). He impressed me then as a man of sterling character, devout Christian practice, and a devoted husband and pastor. He has been an avid student of the Word, a prolific Bible teacher, and an expert at selection of quality reading material for many years. Just to walk into his personal ministerial library was like stepping into another world of literary excellence.

Brother "Marshall" Stewart had roots in the International Pentecostal Holiness Church. He served for many years as pastor of our sister body; The Pentecostal Freewill Baptist Church. Most of those years he served the Black Jack Church near Greenville, North Carolina.

Some months after Brother Stewart's homegoing in February 1999, his family donated the vast majority of his library to the North Carolina Conference of the International Pentecostal Holiness Church. The ministry of this great man can now live on in the lives of those who come to the campus to study. Twelve thousand, one hundred and five (12,105) volumes are available for "inhouse" scanning and perusal.

The R. M. Stewart Ministerial Library will be officially dedicated at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, July 22, 2000, during the Falcon Camp Meeting. This lasting tribute to this man of God who truly a Disciple, Husband, Father, Preacher and Lover of the Word and books is housed in the Resource Development Center of the North Carolina Conference at the corner of West Street and Fayetteville Road in Falcon.

The dedication will take place in the Resource Development Center.

Effective Pastoring: Giving Vision, Direction and Care to Your Church. By Bill Lawrence. Nashville; Word publishing, 1999. 257pp. \$21.99

Effective. This word seems to be the most recent buzz-word concerning ministry that writers of journal articles and authors are using these days. Whether it is the "Effective Pastor," or the "Effective Minister of Education," or the "Effective Evangelistic Churches," or "Maximizing Your Effectiveness," becoming effective (able, convincing, adequate, proficient, productive, or serviceable) appears to be a great concept for hungry and industrious ministers and laypeople alike who desire to please God in all things.

Effective may be defined as having power to produce a specified effect, powerful, serviceable, not merely nominal. Any minister or layperson worth his or her salt wants to be effective in ministry. Lawrence, an experienced Pastor and an instructor of Pastors for the last twenty years, answers many practical questions such as: What are the essential ingredients for pastoral authority? What steps can a pastor take to avoid pastor-elder conflicts? How do you build trust between a pastor and a board'? How do you determine a Church's purpose? What is the pastor's role in developing vision? These are but a sampling of the concerns, issues and problems addressed in the book.

Lawrence wrote, "Entering into a relationship with Christ and then helping others is what pastoring is all about. Nothing is greater than this—no position, or power, or pulpit, nothing!" He also stresses that the Pastor is not the hired "holy man" who does the congregation's religious work. The Pastor is the equipper, the trainer, the developer of others to help them do the work of the ministry.

My favorite chapter was chapter six entitled, "The Order of the Towel," where the author described the servant leader and how that serving others makes for leadership effectiveness. The example of Jesus Christ alone is sufficient to prove the value of servanthood. The Lord Jesus started with twelve men who met in an obscure upstairs room. They had no telecommunications, computers, or printing presses. But still, the Thessalonica city council cried out that Paul and Silas had "turned the world upside down."

The age-old principle of servant leadership continues to work today. I highly recommend this publication to all our ministers and laypersons. It will be a valuable resource both now and in years to come.

SPOTLIGHT ON MEN

"Help ... Help!!"

In the fall of 1999, the people of of eastern North Carolina faced what was probably the most devastating disaster of all time.

Storm after storm ravaged up and down the North Carolina coastline, dumping up to 30 inches of rain. When the violent storms subsided and the beating rains ceased, the area's rivers began to swell. Rising quickly, the rivers soon were well above flood levels.

As the waters raced over the river banks, citizens were forced to leave their homes, some never to return. Today, there are many families that are still displaced. Yet, during this tragic time, there were many of our local churches that were able to come together and offer assistance. One such group was the Mobile Feeding Kitchen from the South Carolina Conference, operating under DRUSA (Disaster Relief USA).

Ready to help, this DRUSA team came to eastern North Carolina and immediately set up their portable kitchen. In the area for approximately five days, the team fed over 8,000 flood victims. (Recall this same team fed over 25,000 in Oklahoma during the tornadoes of 1999). I applaud them for their loyalty and invaluable aid to these communities.

Unfortunately, I am convinced that we have not seen the last of these devastating storms. There will be many more to come, and we must be prepared to face whatever is ahead. Forecasters, for the six-month hurricane season, have predicted eleven named tropical storms in the Atlantic, seven of which will probably become hurricanes. Three will be major storms, with sustained winds of more than 115 mph, forecasters said

Now is the time to began planning our response to disasters. We are in the early stages of establishing several more DRUSA teams like the one that helped down East. We need committed men to volunteer for this vital ministry.

On August 25 and 26, there will be a "Disaster Recovery Team training session in Browns Summit, North Carolina (near Greensboro). We will learn WHAT to do during a disaster and HOW to do it effectively

I believe that God wants us to do whatever we can to help the suffering and to be witnesses to the unsaved Please pray for this program and what YOU can do it be a part of it!

LINES FROM LINDA



I've been out in my yard this morning trying to combat the weeds and grass that were overtaking my flower beds. What a chore!

I was reminded of my earlier years back on the farm. In the spring, when Daddy plowed the field and we planted the seed, we all eagerly watched and waited for the seedlings to pop through the ground and the plants begin to grow. For the first few weeks, it was

exciting to watch them change the drab winter landscape to a brilliant growth of green. However, just about the time we were all enthused with the crops, the weeds began to surface.

When we saw Daddy start sharpening the hoes, we knew what was coming next. From sunup to sundown, we had quality family time in the fields. Some of the weeds grew shallow roots and were easily chopped up. Others required us to dig a little deeper or even pull them out by hand. One thing we learned very early on was that we had to get the root. Mama didn't tolerate for one minute our "slubbering" over our work. (That's what she called it!) We learned that if we just chopped off the top of the weed, it would most likely grow back, requiring us to go back and do what we should have done well in the first place.

I remember a few times when we were a little late getting to the chopping. A rainy season could keep us out of the field while the weeds were fiercely growing. In those instances, we always dreaded what we faced. We knew it would take us twice as long than if we had gotten to the weeds and grass while they were young and tender.

Well, I was reminded of lessons learned in the fields of our Piney Neck farm this morning. I had not used my hoe this spring. When I started to try to chop the grass and weeds, I discovered it to be a laborious job. It finally dawned on me that my hoe was dull. So off I went to my tool box to find the file. Now, my Daddy had a whetstone with which he usually sharpened our hoes, but he also had taken time to teach me how to use the file so I would know how it was supposed to be done. So, after a few minutes, I had successfully sharpened the hoe blade.

Back to the flower bed I went to be reminded of the second lesson — that I had let the weeds and grass grow too long. What would have been a relatively simple chore a month ago was, this morning, a real task. If only I had taken the time last month to spray a little Round-Up!! I chopped and I pulled ... as I panted and fretted at myself for allowing this to happen. However, I did not give up. After a couple of hours and a Diet Coke break, I was able to stand back and admire my well groomed flower beds. Now I can take pride in them and enjoy the blooming plants that now seem much more obvious.

Since I came back into the house, I have been thinking about my experiences back on the farm and in our front yard this morning. You

know, this is not unlike our spiritual life. Sometimes we allow the weeds of the world to grow in the soil of our soul. If we daily attend to our spiritual life, the weeds can be quickly and easily destroyed. However, it we neglect our prayer life and the Word of God, these weeds will begin to take deep root. Before we are even aware of it, our whole attitude and outlook can be under their control.

Maybe, just maybe, we need to keep a closer watch on our lives. Just in case any weeds begin to grow, we need to have our spiritual hoes sharpened and ready for use. It might take a little effort on our part, but there really is no excuse for us to allow the weeds of the world to mar the beauty of our salvation. Let's keep the flower beds of our souls clean and beautiful!

A NO-COOK RECIPE ...

For your next outdoor barbecue or for Sunday lunch, this easy-to-fix BANANA SPLIT CAKE recipe might come in handy.

1/2 cup melted butter or margarine 2 cups graham cracker crumbs

2 eggs2 cups confectioners sugar, sifted3/4 cup butter1 tsp. Vanilla

Beat eggs until thick and light, about five minutes. Add confectioners sugar, butter, and vanilla. Beat all about five minutes. Spread over crumbs and chill for 30 minutes.

1 can (20 oz.) crushed pineapple, drained 4 bananas, sliced 1 container (9 oz.) whipped topping Nuts and cherries, optional

Spread with well-drained pineapple. Arrange sliced bananas over pineapple. Spread whipped topping over bananas. Sprinkle with chopped nuts and decorate with cherries.

Refrigerate at least 6 hours before serving. Store in refrigerator.

Sunday, July 9, is the designated "GO" Offering Sunday for prayer and fasting. July 16 is the alternate Sunday. The Conference regular goal is \$235,000.00. The miracle goal is \$250,000.00. One hundred years ago at the first camp meeting, some \$250.00 was given for missions. It seems right that for the 101st camp meeting some \$250,000.00 should be given — the Lord willing.

LONDON - SPAIN

As I write this article, Betty and I are returning from a missions ministry trip to London and Spain. We spent a week with Steve and Betsy Cofer in London. I taught a class at the CICM Center for International Christian Ministries. It was a great week.

The class ran to 1:30 each weekday. I was teaching I & II Samuel, I & II Kings, and I & II Chronicles. All total I taught 15 sessions. There were some great students.

In the late afternoons and early evenings, Betty and I were able to see some of the sights with Steve and Betsy. They are doing a great job as the Overseas Ministry Coordinators of Europe and the Mideast. New churches are being established and souls are being saved. Steve and Betsy are dear friends and great hosts.

On Friday afternoon, we flew to Spain to visit with missionaries Linwood and Nancy Berry, North Carolina's own. I preached in the Madrid Church on Sunday morning – 140 strong, and the Parla Church on Sunday night – 125 strong. What a great experience! Betty and I felt right at home with our Latino brothers and sisters.

I am so thankful for Linwood and Nancy Berry. They went to Spain in the Spring of 1988. We had no Pentecostal Holiness churches in Spain at that time. Now we have six churches and will organize another one in July. There are twenty-one licensed ministers and four missionaries. Two years ago, the Spanish Conference was organized. In July, they will meet for their 2nd annual meeting. All total there are 290 plus members now in Spain with an average attendance of 500.

Brother Berry's goal is to plant four new churches per year in Spain. He planted four last year. (All planted do not survive. The survival rate is 75%.) He is now able to plant new churches because of the Mustard Seed Institute – a training institute established four years ago.

In addition to their duties in Spain, the Berrys serve as Regional Ministry Coordinators of Southern Europe. They are responsible to cast the missions vision and supervise France, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Malta, Germany, and Switzerland. Goals have been established to start 1½ churches per year per country. A 20% failure rate has been factored in. The Mustard Seed Institute is being expanded into these countries.

The Berrys are in great need of a video projector (cost – \$5,500.00). They are also in need of regular funds for the Mustard Seed Institute. (This institute takes the training into various areas.) Presently over 27 courses are available. These are offered on the Internet as well.

After these days with the Cofers and Berrys, I am more than ever committed to missions. These couples have sacrificed and faced many difficulties. Yet God has blessed them to be very successful. To both of them, Betty and I say THANK YOU and WELL DONE!

Do We Really Care About The Unsaved?

We have been given a tremendous responsibility and gracious privilege. Our Lord Jesus Christ, the Head of His Church, has commissioned us to go into all the world to make disciples of all people we as a corporate body you and I as individuals can escape this Christ-given mandate.

We can sing and really mean it from our hearts, "Jesus Paid It All." It is a fact that He did pay it all on the cross of Calvary. He paid the full payment for our total redemption for this world and the world to come. However, there is a price that each of us must pay if we're going to be His disciples who are obedient to His command to make disciples of all people. Through the ages, someone paid the price to keep the message alive. Countless members of the body of Christ, both clergy and non-clergy, have paid the price to keep the fires of evangelism burning as a testimony to the world that Jesus Christ is alive and lives in us. There are those who have given their lives to make sure this present generation and others to come, until there are no more, hear the Holy Word of God and keep our worship buildings open. Somewhere along ancient and modern campfires of gathering, old men and women have kept the story alive. Someone across the years has trimmed the wick, filled the vessel with oil, or in modern times, flipped the switch or set the thermostat and timer to make sure our buildings were open at worship time. Others have sacrificed means and life itself to make sure the architecture and furnishings of our places of worship have been built, maintained, and preserved.

Others have fought the battle to keep the doctrine pure and have stood as a biblical sentinel to proclaim the lifestyle of believers in the vernacular of their day and in the environment of their circumstances.

With all the above being true, the world around us has become more and more secular instead of spiritual and "religious." The question that increasingly haunts the representatives of the faith today is how to tell the story effectively and communicate the message that God loves men and wants to bring mankind to a relationship with Him through His precious son, Jesus Christ. We live in a world that is largely one of no background memory or vocabulary regarding the Christian faith. We once could talk about agnostics and infidels and atheists, but today, in the words of George G. Hunter, III, in his book, How To Reach Secular People we are faced with a complex communication challenge to reach what we could call "ignostics." These are people to whom the language of the church is totally foreign, who know nothing more than the language of the street, the ghetto, or the corporate world. We must find a way to bridge this seemingly interminable gap and bring the gospel to every heart so that it will affect every life. A few of us cannot do it alone, but it will take the entire body of Christ being more dedicated to reaching our world with the gospel, the good news of God through His son Jesus Christ. We need a fresh infusion of power from on high in the person of the Holy Ghost to thrust us forward into His harvest field.

We must, in the terms of many modern teachers and Christian philosophers, be conscious that we must produce a "secret sensitive" atmosphere. However, we cannot afford to water down the gospel or minimize the importance of doctrinal tenets that have provided a strong bedrock of stability across the years. They have provided this stability because they are founded on the principles of the Holy Word of God.

If we're going to reach our world, we must offer people hope beyond this vale of tears. We must go to their "turf." We cannot hide in the shelter of our sanctuaries and behind the closed doors of our beautiful

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brotherly relationships. We must identify those who need Christ, reach those who are receptive, and through them reach across social networks to meet the needs of our secular society today. We cannot hide in our secret chambers. WE must communicate with secular people. There are some things that we must bring to the forefront of our considerations if we are going to reach our generation for Jesus. We must know and not equivocate that people who aren't disciples are lost. We cannot change that; they cannot change that; only the grace of God can change that. That makes it ultimately important that we find ways of one-on-one communication with the people of our secular society to convince them by our lifestyle and attitude toward them that lost people really do matter to God. But we must convince them that lost people matter not only to God but to us as well. We must know and strongly proclaim that our gathering as a church body is not for a fashion show or just for a few birds of a feather who want to flock together, but primarily a mission to lost people: hurting, confused, dying people. In order to reach our world, we must know what to change and what to preserve. We must search every procedure, methodology, and any other "sacred cow" to determine if it is of God or man. If it is scriptural and of God, then keep it with all your might. If it is simply the trappings of man, then we should denounce it for what it is and free ourselves from unnecessary baggage.

If we are going to reach our world, we must know the importance of understanding, loving, and yes, even liking some people outside the church fellowship. Some of our fellowship and associations must take in those people and not just people who always think, look, and act as we do. If we are really going to reach our secular society, the compassion of Jesus must grip our hearts and our minds and change our attitude toward accepting unchurched people. We must go before God in sincere prayer that the Holy Spirit may guide us in our methodology in reaching the unreached. To do this, we're going to have to reemphasize the importance of starting new congregations. It is entirely possible that some current congregations are so steeped in tradition that it will be impossible for them to change enough to reach a lost and dying world. It will be only the creation of new worship centers that will draw some sinners into the corporate body. If we are going to reach our world, we must leap beyond the immediate and local. We must become more involved in a sense of "world evangelism" than ever before. Our own towns, villages, and countryside have now become a melting pot of colors, languages, and religions. Oh, how we must have the

compassion of Jesus and the wisdom of the Holy Ghost to reach our world. We must not, and we will not compromise gospel truth; but we must find tables from which they will eat and fountains from which they will drink. It may be that in your locale, you will need to identify a certain target population. It may be a certain culture, socio-economic level of folk, or a certain age group that you will be able to reach more than you can reach others. I'm convinced that with the graying of America, we need some people who are willing to start new churches among the senior citizens of this country. I know that such a congregation would have a higher turnover rate, but when you consider the number of senior citizens who are going to inhabit our communities over the next few years, should Jesus tarry, we probably need some people who are willing to make the sacrifice to plant churches that will appeal to those dear people. There are others who will need to go after the young or some other specific age group. I know that there should be room in every congregation for all kinds of people. Let's face it, the ideal is not always reality. We must reach people where they are to bring them to where they need to be for the glory of God. We must, with the leadership of the Holy Spirit, implement a strategy for reaching unchurched people right where we are.

To do this, we must emphasize again the fact that ministry is not simply a clergy activity. We must deploy all our congregation and all our Christian associates in ministry. To do so, we must train all our people for Christian witness. All of them cannot do the same thing, and all of them will not be eloquent teachers and preachers of the gospel. All of them can share Jesus in such a way as to make Him attractive to someone. This is a challenge to our people to commit our very lives to evangelism and to open our hearts to the presence and power of God. In doing so, we must not allow ourselves to indulge in "in-house fighting" or doing everything with a sense of competition with the other group down the road. We must reach our generation, no matter our age or how long we have been in the church. We must not let the lack of long-time experience cripple and stifle the initiative of young soul winners to go forth into our secular world to touch lives for the cause of Jesus Christ.

Again, in the spirit of my title of this article, do we really care about unsaved people? If so, what are we doing about it? **JUST A THOUGHT!**

The Habits of Highly Effective Churches. By George Barna, California: Regal books, 1999, 194 pp. \$17.99

The Barna Research Group led by George Barna continues to serve the Church in a powerful and instrumental way. This publication provides some hard-hitting facts and statistics that will awaken even the semi-conscious Christian worker concerning the ineffectiveness of a large majority of Churches across America and how to transform any local body of believers into a vibrant, highly effective and productive ministry. Anyone interested?

Beneficial habits of highly effective Churches include (1)Rely upon strategic leadership, (2)Organize to facilitate highly effective ministry, (3)Emphasize developing significant relationships within the congregation, (4)Congregants invest themselves in genuine worship, (5)Engage in strategic evangelism, (6)Get people involved in systematic theological growt, (7)Utilize holistic stewardship practices, (8) Serve the needy people in the community, and (9)Equip families to minister to themselves.

John Maxwell, in commenting on this book, wrote, "The Habits of Highly Effective Churches is the silver bullet that kills common Christian misconceptions about what makes up a 'successful' congrega-

tion." Indeed, the nine chapters explain each habit respectively, and identify some macro-processes to transform the local church in becoming effective. As I read this book, I discovered it very difficult to lay aside for other competing activities and responsibilities. The chapter "Facilitating Genuine Worship" alone is worth the cost of the publication.

Time For Truth: Living Free In A World of Lies, Hype and Spin. By Os Guinness. Grand Rapids: Baker Book House, 2000, 128 pp. \$12.99

Authors like G.K. Chesterton, J.I. Packer, Ravi Zacharias, C.S. Lewis, A.W. Tozer, Ray Stedman, Erwin Lutzer, Joseph Stowell, and Francis Schaeffer can really stir my spirit about the age in which we live. Os Guinness deserves a high and prominent ranking within this group. As penetratingly as any modern author, his acute perceptions of the times in which we live are extraordinary and extremely helpful for anyone who desires to understand the spirit of the age, and how to combat the evil forces and philosophies that seek to undermine and even eradicate the influence and existence of the Christian Church.

Guinness says that truth matters supremely because without truth, there is no freedom. He equates truth with freedom. The only way to live is to become a person of truth. If truth is dead, he argues, all that remains is a world of lies, hype, and spin. Throughout the book, the author recalls numerous incidents in the history of this country and around the world where truth was weighed in the balance. He contends that within the West, truth in any objective or absolute sense no longer exists. In a postmodern world, the question is no longer "ls it true?" but rather "Whose truth is it?" and "Which power stands to gain?" No wonder what remains in the West is a world of lies, hype, and spin. For example, what was deviant fifty years ago is today just par for the course. Many Americans believe there is no right or wrong—only fun or boring. Has America learned to live with lies? This is sad, especially in light of the fact that the United States is the child of the Protestant Reformation, where truth overcame a whole host of lies and more lies, religious or otherwise.

But thank God for the truth that comes from His precious, infallible Word! Truth is not, in fact, dead. It is alive, and by becoming people of truth, God's truth, we learn to live free. Christians are obligated to seek the truth, speak the truth, and live the truth. Truth that comes from God leads us to God. Our faith is not true because it works; it works because it is true. For this reason, we should be devoted contenders of the faith because it is a definite, dogmatic and delivered faith! We will be held accountable for how we handle and pass on that faith which was delivered to us.

Your heart, soul, mind, and spirit will be powerfully stirred after a careful reading of this publication. Buy the truth and sell it not. By all means, buy the book and read it for profit!




${\bf ``Leadership''}$

LINES FROM LINDA...

I awoke to an eerie silence. No sound of air conditioning unit! No refrigerator motor noise! No ceiling fan humming! No buzz of the alarm clock sounding! I soon realized our electricity was off. We were without power. This was Sunday morning. I had big plans for the day. My family was coming for lunch. I had the roast ready for the oven and the collards waiting to go in the pot ... but there was no power!

Years ago that would have been no problem. My mother started out with a wood stove, an ice box, and a wind-up clock. My first recollection of our kitchen is a Perfection wood stove which my father had converted to kerosene. She cooked many good meals and homemade biscuits with it. We had a refrigerator which depended on the ice man's delivery to keep things cold. We would chip ice off the big block to make a refreshing glass of iced tea or lemonade. We didn't have the luxury of a ceiling fan. The only cool we got was when a breeze blew through the open windows. The old wind-up alarm clock ticked so loudly you could hardly sleep soundly enough to need the startling, clamoring ring it gave off in the morning.

Yes, I am old enough to remember when we couldn't flip a switch and say "let there be light." We had kerosene lanterns and lamps to light our way. We didn't even have the luxury of having a lamp in every room. We carried the lamp with us from room to room as the family moved from one activity to the other. We had one special lamp — the mantle lamp — which I thought must be sacred. It was my mother's pride and joy, quite a pretty piece with its decorative white milkglass shade. I thought then that we couldn't bother it because it was so beautiful and special to my mother. I didn't realize that the reason you couldn't move it around was because of the fragile nature of the mantle that covered the flame.

After supper at night, the family would gather in the "sitting room" as my brothers did their homework by the light of the beautiful lamp. We didn't have a laundry room, so Moma might have the ironing board up and gas iron on as she ironed our clothes – everything – even the underwear. She taught us all how to iron ... in a family of eight, ironing was some chore. (Does anybody remember how everything was starched in Argo starch?) Daddy enjoyed the battery-operated radio and most often would be able to find somewhere on the dial a little music amidst the static. His favorite was on Saturday night when the *Grand Ole Opry* came on over Station WCKY, Cincinnati, Ohio. (Isn't it strange to remember the call letters of that station when some days I can hardly remember what happened yesterday?)

No phones ringing! No television blaring! No computers and video games! On a warm August night, you might find us on the front porch where Daddy & Moma were in the swing. We children could be found busy catching fireflies (we called them lightning bugs). Most of the time we had company. Aunts, uncles, cousins, and friends joined us as we played "Ain't no bears out tonight" and "Hide and Go Seek." Running around outside with the moon and stars serving as our area light, we created our own entertainment. We really had fun. The lack of electricity didn't bother us, for we had never known its luxury.

Well, I don't know how I got off on all that, for I started out telling you about waking up without power. My intent was just to share what a helpless feeling it is to wake up and realize you are powerless. Anyway, when I awoke and realized we had no power, a spiritual

analogy came to mind. We had recently studied in Sunday school how the Holy Ghost Baptism brings power to the believer. We reviewed the mighty acts of the apostles where the *dynamite* power of the Holy Spirit was at work in their ministry. As I pondered that scriptural account of the early church, I began to think about the church today. Are we truly exercising the power which Christ gave us the authority to use? Are we allowing His Holy Spirit to keep us charged, or are we neglecting His Word and time in His presence and letting the Power dwindle from our lives? Will we wake up one morning without Power?

This caused me to reflect on my relationship with the Lord. I don't want to awaken one morning to the eerie silence of a life without the power and presence of the Holy Spirit. Do you?

2000 NCWM CONVENTION A SUCCESS

- 4. **Do the hardest things first.** Explore ways to make unpleasant responsibilities more enjoyable, either in the way you do them or in the attitude you choose while doing them. We do better when we have something to look forward to. Hope is central to positive motivation.
- 5. Break projects in manageable units. Space projects over a longer period of time. Most big achievements are the sum of many little achievements.
- 6. Surround yourself with as much order as possible. Order reinforces order. Conversely, disorder in one area of life tends to spill over in other areas. Avoid tackling too much at once. Let one victory lead to another.



From the Superintendent

September is Stewardship Emphasis Month throughout the International Pentecostal Holiness Church. Reverend Roland Harrell, author of the following article, is the Secretary-Treasurer of the North Carolina Conference.

The Conference Stewardship Officer presents a challenging message to us in the following paragraphs.

STEWARDSHIP LIVING

The term *stewardship* naturally has the connotation of referring to finances; however, the Bible expands the stewardship concept to apply to the entirety of a believer's life. Financial responsibility to Kingdom causes is indeed an aspect of stewardship that must not be overlooked, but the Biblical basis of appropriate giving is predicated on appropriate living. Financial stewardship evolves from a stewardship lifestyle.

The first step to appropriate Biblical stewardship in any aspect of personal and church responsibility must be preceded by a decision on the part of a Christian to be a good steward of the grace of God that brought us our salvation. "As every man hath received...so minister the same one to another, as good Stewards of the manifold grace of God" (1 Peter 4:10).

STEWARDSHIP LIVING WILL BE CHALLENGED.

When you make a decision to honor God with your life in everything you do, that decision will be instantly challenged by Satan. The young prophet Daniel is a good example of this fact. Even in his teens, Daniel was conscious of his responsibility to honor God with his lifestyle. His convictions demanded that he stay away from idolatry and anything that honored or reverenced it. As a captive in Babylon faced with eating food that was offered to idols, it seemed impossible to live by his principles.

In our daily lives, circumstances will contrive to rob us of convictions. Our principles will be challenged and our commitment to God questioned and made light of. What we do under fire will determine every other aspect of our lives. Stewardship living will be the determining factor in everything else in our lives.

STEWARDSHIP LIVING WILL BE COSTLY. Stephen was a powerful, Spirit-filled deacon/evangelist in the early Apostolic church. Being a good steward of the manifold grace

of God cost him his life. While declaring the gospel before the Sanhedrin, the religious court of Israel, the truth so infuriated the hearers they forced him to the edge of the city, where they stoned him to death.

Being a good steward of the grace of God will surely not require every believer to lay down his life, but it will require us to totally give up our lives to Christ without reservation and to trust the Lord completely with everything we are or ever hope to be. Good stewards have died to self so as to live completely for Christ.

Daniel made stewardship the hallmark of his life and was tossed into a den of lions as a result. His Hebrew friends were thrown into a furnace of fire because of their commitment to stewardship living. It is likely that a faithful steward of the grace of God will experience some degree of persecution for his/her faith. As long as we live and minister in a world that is managed and controlled by Satan, we are in enemy territory and can expect retaliation. Stewardship may not always be the easiest way to take.

STEWARDSHIP LIVING WILL BE COMPENSATED.

The fact that stewardship may be costly is not the last word on the matter. Stewardship will always be divinely

compensated. Daniel was cast into the lions' den, and his friends into the furnace of fire, but God protected them.

What about Stephen? Stephen's desire was to make a difference with the Gospel: to do something for Christ that would impact the world. Critics would say he died too soon and his ministry was cut off. It seemed, on the face of it, that he failed. But there was a young Roman

citizen in the crowd whose consent to the deed encouraged the crowd to stone Stephen. That Roman citizen watched and listened as the evangelist related his vision of Christ in heaven and prayed for forgiveness for his persecutors. That Roman citizen would become the Apostle Paul. He never escaped the impact of Stephen's dying testimony. Stephen will be recognized in glory as the man who won Paul to Jesus Christ. Paul in turn became the greatest Christian witness this world has yet known. He gave us at least thirteen and possibly fourteen of the books of the New Testament.

God has a marvelous way of compensating the person who chooses to live a stewardship life. The prophet Malachi (3:10) says that when we practice stewardship living, God opens the very windows of heaven and showers us with blessings beyond our expectation.

Our responsibility is to take a stand, defend principle, live by conviction, and witness the Gospel; and it is God's responsibility to make sure our labor is not in vain.

Let us be aware this September that stewardship living is the only kind of life that is worthwhile.

Nothing But the Truth: Upholding the Gospel in a Doubting Age. By John MacArthur. Wheaton: Crossway Books, 1999. 203 pp. \$10.99

John MacArthur has, in his usual and thorough fashion, centered in on the heart of the problem in terms of the Church's supreme mission on earth embodied in the Great Commission to evangelize the world and make disciples. He emphasizes the need for every Christian to be ready to make a

defense to everyone who asks you to give an account for the hope that is in you.

Admitting that being a witness to the Gospel is becoming increasingly difficult in this rapidly changing world, the author provides answers to four basic problems in any Gospel presentation, which are (1) the attitude of the believer, (2) the preparedness of the believer, (3) the content of the answers, and (4) the biblical priority of witnessing.

If Christians know that the return of Jesus Christ is near, it should be incentive enough to witness while there is still time. A desire to share the Gospel is one thing. Knowing what to say to a seeking unbeliever is another. The author provides a scripturally sound presentation, which can prepare the witness, that is available, worshipful, submissive, obedient, and dependent upon God's power. Finally, the author focuses on taking it to the streets. He stated, "Our great mission in the church is to love, learn, and live to call men and women to Jesus Christ." The Lord Jesus led the way. He demonstrated a consistent, soul-winning lifestyle.

If you are looking for something "new" in regard to

evangelism, then this book would not be a good buy. But if you are looking for a strong New Testament emphasis on evangelism for today, then it is highly recommended.

A Time for Truth: A Study of Ecclesiastes 3:1-8. By Stephen Olford. Chattanooga: AMG Publishers, 1999. 167 pp. \$14.95

This publication is a compilation of fifteen sermons from the text of Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 by

a prince of expositors, Stephen Olford, who addresses the main issues of life from the standpoint of truth—not just any truth, but truth based on God's infallible Word.

Modern man has become so earthbound and materialistic that he has overlooked the fact that he is a creature of eternity. If a person gets it wrong here, he will get it wrong forever. Olford presupposes that man's fulfillment in life can come only by obedience to God's truth. Anything less is a lie.

It is simply astounding as to how many important issues of life are contained in this relatively short work: from birth and death, sowing and reaping, killing and healing, destroying and building, weeping and laughing, mourning and dancing, gathering and casting away stones, gaining and losing, to making heavenly investments and throwing away sin in our lives. Olford expertly addresses these effects and results of life. He effectively bridges the gap from the ancient text to our contemporary age.

There are many applications and advantages that can be realized from a possession of this book. It is highly and warmly recommended to all in Christian ministry.



LINES FROM LINDA...

I am a bumper sticker reader! I find it quite interesting to read the messages people project. You've seen them. HONK IF YOU LOVE JESUS. I DON'T CARE HOW THEY DID IT UP NORTH. DON'T BLAME ME, I VOTED REPUBLICAN. A bumper sticker always tells you something about the person who put it there.

MY CHILD IS AN HONOR STUDENT AT WEST STREET SCHOOL. That parent is obviously proud of his/her child. I recently saw an interesting one that read, MY CHILD BEAT UP YOUR HONOR STUDENT. Naturally, I wondered what kind of person was driving that car.

People use bumper stickers to promote their favorite political candidate. As a matter of fact, I have one on my car at the present time. SCOTT THOMAS FOR SENATE. Scott is our oldest son, so naturally Mom is helping him in his campaign.

I saw a bumper sticker the other day, though, that really captured my attention. Nothing fancy, just a plain red and white sticker that read *SHOW UNBRIDLED ENTHUSIASM*. I visualized the person who would bear this message as one who is vibrant and exuberant. I don't know what excites that driver or what he/she is enthusiastic about, but when I read the bumper sticker, it spoke a message to me.

I guess the key word in that bumper sticker is *unbridled*. What does it mean? I grew up on a farm. I watched my Daddy put the bridle on our horse or mule many times. The bridle headgear carried the bits and reins which allowed my father to govern the direction of the animal. It served as a restraint to keep the horse in his control.

I know very well that all of us express ourselves differently, but I can't help but wonder if perhaps some of us are bridled. Does the influence of other ideals have control over us to the extent that we are not free to show the proper enthusiasm for the Lord Jesus Christ? Are we guilty of quenching the prompting of the Holy Spirit in order not to offend anyone? Are we afraid to show enthusiasm about our salvation for fear of how the world will label us?

I am reminded of a statement I read in the Assemblies of God magazine several years ago. I don't know who wrote it, but I copied it on the flyleaf of my Bible. "One of the church's greatest losses has been fervent, spontaneous, uninhibited praises by the children of God."

I agree that the church loses something when we fail to respond to the prompting of the Holy Spirit and allow ourselves to worship freely. That is not to say that every person should clap or dance in worship. Some may have a very quiet demeanor; but, no matter what our personality or worship style, when the Holy Spirit deals with us, our hearts must be open and our spirits free to respond in praise ... fervent, spontaneous, uninhibited praise.

Enthusiasm is contagious. Enthusiasm will attract. If we are enthusiastic about God's work and will openly, freely worship Him, people will want to join us. We must not be bound by tradition. We must be responsive to God's leading and excited about His business. The only bridle we need is the bridle of the Holy Spirit, with the bits and reins in God's control.

YUMMY AMBROSIA SALAD

For Sunday lunch or group entertaining, you might like this salad as a side dish or even a dessert. It yields 10 to 12 small servings.

- 1 small package instant pistachio pudding
- 1 16-ounce can chunky pineapple
- 18-ounce can crushed pineapple
- 1 cup shredded coconut
- 1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans
- 12 to 16 ounces of nondairy whipped topping (thawed)
- 1 cup miniature marshmallows
- 1 small jar drained maraschino cherries (optional)

In a large bowl, mix the two types of pineapple and sprinkle the pudding on top. Let the mixture sit for 3 minutes. Combine nuts and coconut; fold into the mixture. Slowly blend in the whipped topping and marshmallows. Refrigerate for a minimum of 2 hours before serving. Add drained cherries for color as well as taste.

You can make individual servings in sherbet or wine glasses and sprinkle with a dash of cinnamon sugar for a beautiful presentation.

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



REVITALIZED RED SPRINGS PHC BURNS NOTE

A Note Burning Ceremony was held at the Red Springs Pentecostal Holiness Church, 945 West Third Avenue, on Sunday, July 30, 2000, at 10:30 a.m. Present for this service were Roland Harrell, the N.C. General Conference Secretary-Treasurer, and his wife, Phyllis Harrell; the Interim Pastor Rev. Tim B. Henry; his son, C. T. Henry and wife, Tate Henry; along with the church board, members and friends. This seemingly average, everyday Note Burning Ceremony was anything but "everyday" for the Red Springs Pentecostal Holiness Church, as another miracle in the history of the church had been witnessed. One would probably say, "Well, that's not such a big deal, it happens every day!" But wait till you hear the miracle God has performed in their midst.

As some may know, the Red Springs Pentecostal Holiness

Church was of ficially organized on July 6, 1947, after an extended tent revival that was held on North Main Street (the site where the Watson McNeill house now stands, next to Roscoe's gas

station). Thirty-five people united with the church at that time. A few months late,r the tent moved just beyond where the church presently stands (945 West Third Avenue-Maxton Highway). On November 25, 1947, Robbins Mills, Inc. deeded the lot on which to build, and construction began. The first Sunday in the new sanctuary, over 100 people were present to enter their new place of worship.

Over the years many changes have taken place, both structural and organizational, as well as spiritual. But the almost remarkable changes have been in the last few years. Things seemed to look bleak and hopeless for the church, as most everyone associated with the church (all but a few faithful members) seemed to have lost all interest, not only in helping to keep the church going financially but in attendance as well. And so, with just a handful of determined Christians, the interim pastor, Rev. Tim B. Henry (an 84-year-old retired minister), was sent to pastor the church. But let me state that this 84-year-old man ain't RETIRED. He is the hardest working "FIREBALL" this church has been blessed with in years. So, along with the Pastor, this handful of dedicated and determined members began to raise money from plate sales and other fund-raising projects. But it seemed that with all they did, it just wasn't enough to keep their heads above water. But, with God in control, "all things are possible" and the MIRACLE began to unfold. At that time, the church owed a little over \$43,000. (Not much you might say, but to a church body of only 15-30

people, this was a huge burden.) And in spite of the way things looked, the members knew and believed that this church was founded on FAITH in a Mighty God who was and is in control, and that God's church could not and would not fail. So through fasting and prayer, God began to move upon the heart of a man who lived in Scottsdale, Arizona. This man, C.T. Henry (Pastor T. B. Henry's son), was led by God to write letters to all the churches in the conference and all his friends and associates to donate money to help the church pay off this debt. And from the letters mailed out, the church began to receive a hundred dollars from here, fivehundred dollars from there, and then THOUSANDS started coming in. They even had an atheist to give a thousand dollars (DON'T TELL ME GOD'S NOT IN CONTROL). And so on Sunday, July 30, with a church full of members and friends, including the Conference Secretary and Treasurer, Roland Harrell and his wife, Phyllis, as well as C. T. and Tate Henry, they watched the result of the miracle of their indebtedness of \$43,000 PAID IN FULL in a little over a year (18 months from the date Pastor T. B. Henry arrived, and 13 months after C. T. Henry's letter went out), as the NOTE WAS BURNED.

The outcome of this wonderful miracle has been that the church's attendance has increased, their faith has been renewed, and the Holy Spirit – ever present – is moving in the hearts and lives of the old and young alike. Many are being saved, and the young are becoming more involved in witnessing and inviting people, no matter what race or ethnic background, to come join in and see the mighty move of God and His wondrous blessings in their church and in their lives.

Ten Lies About God: And How You Might Already Be Deceived. By Erwin Lutzer. Nashville:

Word Publishing, 2000. 238 pp. \$19.99

This book by Erwin Lutzer, senior pastor of the Moody Church in Chicago, provides an excellent treatment on the subject of Satanic deception concerning our Maker that has become prominent even in the Christian Church. Satan's policy has always been to conceal himself and his evil works whenever possible from the world and the Church. Incredibly, much of the modern world disbelieves his existence. Even the professing Church has developed a smug complacency concerning the Enemy of our souls and his diabolical tactics

Screwtape's advice to Wormwood his nephew, "The safest road to Hell is the gradual one the gentle slope, soft underfoot, without sudden turnings, without milestones, without signposts," suggests that Satan's method is to lull people into believing half truths and satisfying them with subtle, hidden lies that give a semblance of truth, and yet prove to be separated from true truth as purgatory is from hell.

Lutzer challenges the accuracy of ten common beliefs about God. They are (1) God is whatever we want Him to be; (2)Many paths lead into God's presence; (3) God is more tolerant than He used to be; (4) God has never personally suffered; (5) God is obligated to save followers of other religions; (6) God takes no responsibility for natural disasters; (7) God does not know our decisions before we make them; (8) The Fall ruined God's plan; (9) We must choose between God's pleasure and our own; (10) God helps those who help themselves.

His premise is simple. The clearer we see God, the clearer we see ourselves. The reason why humanity at large fails to see itself in reality is because of a blurred or darkened understanding of the person and works of God. The clearer our theology, the better we understand ourselves. When we think clearly about God and derive our knowledge of God from the Bible alone, then our understanding about sin, Satan, suffering, holiness, righteousness, salvation, and the future definitely improves.

This book makes for fascinating reading. For example, the subtle lie that God does not know our decisions before we make them has found its way into the modem church. The idea that God is finite is foreign to Scripture, and yet there are Christian professors who advocate that God knows only potentialities, not actualities This implies that God is "ignorant" about some things, which such belief doesn't deserve the time of day. In addition, how many well meaning Christians believe that "God helps those who help themselves," is actually a verse in the Bible? The truth is that God helps those who cannot help themselves. For example, if we could save ourselves, then the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ would have been unnecessary. Without Jesus Christ, we can do nothing.

The Apostle Paul warned that the last days would be spiritually perilous. An inadequate view of God only augments such peril. Therefore, this is a helpful book for the determined reader.


SPOTLIGHT ON MEN

Ray Hughes, Jr., shared with us that, "For many years there has been a belief by many that 'ministry' is just for 'ministers.' In their book **The Lay Ministry Revolution**, Eddy Hall and Gary Morsch dispel many of the old ideas promoting the myth about ministry. They explain that the myth has no doubt kept millions of Christians from viewing themselves as ministers and recognizing God's call on their lives, thus paralyzing them and keeping them from doing God's will.

"More than four decades ago, Elton Trueblood wrote, 'If the average church should suddenly take seriously the notion that every lay member – man or woman – is really a minister of Christ, we could have something like a revolution in a very short time.' We find today that the churches that are really growing and making a difference are utilizing the laity to a great extent. A return by all churches to this New Testament approach to ministry could indeed start a revolution.

"It is difficult to ascertain where the myth first arose since we do not find its origin in Scripture. The New Testament is very clear on this issue and points out that every Christian has been given one or more spiritual gifts (I Corinthians 12 4,7; Ephesians 4:11). Thus; all Christians are called, whatever their vocation, to share the love of Christ with others and take the needs and concerns of people everywhere to God.

"When members of a local congregation begin to view themselves as ministers, the bulk of the ministry begins to take place outside the sanctuary. One of the main purposes then of coming together as a congregation is equipping the members for ministry. What is happening throughout the week in the community as members use their ministry gifts becomes vitally important to the life of the church and promotes real church growth.

"The impact this book **The Lay Ministry Revolution** leaves with us is – If I am a Christian, I am called to minister."

LINES FROM LINDA ...

Recently my "forever friends" (we met in first grade) and I spent a few days together at the beach. This has become a summer ritual for us, and each year we look for something a

little different to do to occupy our time together. We learned that another of our life-long buddies had, since his retirement, started working part-time for a tour group in the area. He invited us to take one of his tours. So early one morning we packed our lunch and geared up with mosquito spray and drove to Harkers Island. There we found the dock from which Mule Train tours embarked. We boarded the ferry boat and soon were headed across the sound. Cape Lookout was our destination. Upon arrival, Bud (as Bill Blair is affectionately known to me) directed us to the lighthouse keeper's house, which is now a museum. We browsed there and read about the history of the island and the lighthouse. The Cape Lookout Lighthouse, with its distinctive black-and-white diamond pattern, is the most famous landmark on Core Banks. We learned that the lighthouse had been built in the 1850s on the site where an earlier lighthouse was built in 1812. It was built to signal the whereabouts of the treacherous Cape Lookout shoals.

We soon were invited to load onto the back of a quaint pick-up truck turned beach buggy. As we set out over sandy paths, Bud stopped frequently to share with us points of interest regarding the island. Some of what he told us was historical fact; however, much was based on folklore...and some of it was "Blair fabricated," as he is quite a storyteller. We saw the ghost forest of oak and cedar, gnarled and barren in the midst of sand dunes. He showed us the sea turtle habitats protected from predators by wire mesh spread over their nests in the sand. We visited the one remaining neighborhood, just a few houses which have been grandfathered in as the National Park Service has taken over the island. The few structures left will soon have to be abandoned. We even met up with a long-time friend, David Yeoman, who spends his summers there at his old home place. He, too, shared a story and a song with us.

Touring and learning the history of this part of God's creation made for a fun-filled and adventuresome day. But all the while we toured, talked, and laughed, standing towering over us was the dominant feature of the island, the Lighthouse. I had admired it in photos before the visit. It quickly caught my eye as we traveled toward it on the ferry

boat. But as we approached it on land and stood in its shadow, I seemed to feel the significance of that long-standing and life-saving structure.

As I viewed the lighthouse, I saw a tall building, very simple in design with its only unique attribute being the

diamond design painted on it. It reminded me of a huge smokestack rising out of the sand. However, I knew the foundation upon which it is built must be solid rock in order for it to have withstood 150 years of weather and storms. At the top I saw a glass enclosure housing a very powerful light. As I studied the structure, I began to make a spiritual analogy.

As Christians, we are designed to be lighthouses. We are each unique and different in shape and design. Though we may appear to the world to be just another person on the sinking sand of time, our foundation is sure, for we are built on the Solid Rock. We are designed by God to guide people safely through the journey of life. How do we do this?

Though the stark black-and-white diamond design on the structure of the Cape Lookout Lighthouse is quite beautiful, it is of very little value to the lost sailor on a dark night or rainy day. Without the light at the top of its tower, it is not visible very

far. The light is what makes the lighthouse worthwhile and purposeful. As the light sends out its beam, sailors are able to steer their ships safely away from the danger zone.

As human beings, without the Light of Jesus shining forth from us, we are just another physical "structure." However, as we stand firmly planted on the Rock and allow His light to shine through us, we can be spiritual lighthouses directing others to places of eternal safety.

I remember Bud telling us how the lighthouse keepers in years past had to climb the tower to clean the mirrors that reflect the light and the windows through which the light shines. That reminds me that I need to keep my life clean so the Light of Christ can shine brightly through me.

Well, I feel like my day at Cape Lookout was well spent. I enjoyed my visit. I enjoyed the time with my friends. And...as I was reminded that God has designed me to be a Lighthouse, I was spiritually enriched as well. God grant that my light will shine brightly to help those who are lost in the storms of life to find safety and prevent shipwreck.

METHODS & HELPFUL SUGGESTIONS FOR HISPANIC CHURCH PLANTING

There are as many different ways to start a Hispanic Church as there are church members and present churches. The Holy Spirit is creative. He works in many different ways.

The very best way to start Hispanic churches is for other churches to start churches. Following is a list of benefits for Anglo churches to start Hispanic churches and some possible problems.

Benefits in Starting a Church

- 1. The church is aware that it is carrying out a clear command of the Lord to make disciples and establish His work in the world.
- 2. Anglos who are unable to be foreign missionaries are privileged to help begin a work that is crossing cultural and racial barriers.
- 3. God may use this cross-cultural ministry to call a worker to foreign missionary service.
- 4. Giving Anglos become recipients of God's special blessing. "You can't outgive God." A Church gives its building and equipment, and it will be given back good measure pressed down and shaken together.
- 5. Tangibly seeing the fruit the other church growing.
- 6. The feeling of a Home Mission Project.
- 7. Self-satisfaction as a minister helping another minister.
- 8. The Spanish congregation always helps on workdays of the church.
- 9. It will erase bigotry.
- 10. Educated to another culture both ways.
- 11. Possible personal church growth when the Spanish people meet Americans they will tell them to go to your church.
- 12. Often there are experts among this group that meet special needs of the Anglos.

Potential Problems

- 1. Prejudice will arise in the hearts of some of the Americans.
- 2. Extra wear and tear on building and equipment.
- 3. If something is wrong, the Spanish people are the first to get the blame.
- 4. Their standard of cleanliness is different from yours.
- 5. Existing Anglo church becomes resentful of somebody using what is theirs.
- 6. Time usage they want more than you want to give them.

Practical Suggestions

- 1. The Spanish church should carry some burden.
- 2. Make a written contract.
- 3. Provide them space for their own supplies.
- 4. The American church should invite them to their events work days, revivals, dinners, etc.
- 5. Make a list of guidelines for the Spanish church, such as times of building use, who has keys, what they can and cannot use, etc.
- 6. The pastor should never speak negatively about the Spanish church to his congregation.
- 7. The American pastor should never look down at the Spanish pastor but rather perceive him as a coworker.
- 8. They need their own sign.
- 9. A short term of two to three years.
- The Anglo pastor must always side with the Spanish congregation.
- 11. Know who has the keys and forbid reproductions.
- 12. All "official" communications between the two groups should only be done through the pastor or the assigned person.
- 13. The two pastors must talk out their basic beliefs.
- An ultra-legalistic Spanish church should not use a more liberal church's facility.
- 15. Joint services should be planned occasionally to allow the people time to worship together. This will bond the people.
- 16. Both should celebrate together the salvation of souls.

Our denominational emphasis is *ministry*, meeting the spiritual, emotional, or physical needs of others. Whether or not your church is actively involved in this pursuit and to what degree will be largely determined by how you view the church and how you define its relationship with the lost world.

In Romans 12:2, the apostle Paul wrote: "Be not conformed to this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind." Our *minds*, along with our spirits, are supposed to be changed by the new life we have in Jesus. In Philippians 2:5 Paul wrote, "Let this mind be in you which was in

A twisted worldview will warp all you try to do for the Lord.

Christ Jesus..." Our minds must line up with His mind if we are to be like Him.

The way you look at life determines how you react to situations, how you interact with other people. If your worldview is askew, you will never live the life God intends for you to live. A twisted worldview will warp all you try to do for the Lord.

How do you view the church's relationship with the world? Do you view the church as its own major field of labor, as a defensive fortress to protect the saints from the hostile world, or as a force moving out to gather the harvest that Jesus said is already ripe?

Thinking of the church as the *field* means that we believe our evangelism should be centered among those who attend the weekly worship services. The way to get people saved, then, is to get them to come to church. If they do not, we don't have to be concerned about them.

Seeing the church as a *fortress* means viewing those outside as a threat. Since anyone outside the fortress is viewed as a threat to the safety of those within, there is no attempt to reach them; after all, they are the reason the fortress was constructed. They are the enemy.

By contrast, if we view the church as a *force* for reaping the harvest, those not in church are eagerly sought. They are not viewed as the enemy, but rather as prisoners OF the enemy to be liberated. The church that is striving to be a force in its community will see the necessity of impacting that community.

How we view the church will determine how we design the ministries of the church. If we view the church as the *field*, all our ministries will be concentrated on reaching those within, and it will actually be viewed as a good thing when there are no *sinners* attending the church! If the church is viewed as a *fortress*, then all the ministries of the church will be

intended to protect those within from attack by those without. The church will be viewed as the last obstacle preventing the enemy from destroying the saints. But if the church is viewed as a *force*, it will deliberately design ministries to expand its influence into the surrounding community.

Do you perceive the church as the *field*, as a *fortress*, or as a *force* for change in today's world?

The ministries provided by Church Education are designed to produce churches that are a force in their communities.

COLLEGE SENIOR REVEREND RAYMOND POTTER

At the rate he's going, Raymond Potter should graduate from college before he's 75. With honors.

The 71-year-old with a 4.0 grade point average and 54 credit

hours under his belt is a different class of student for East Carolina University – a sophomore who's a senior.

Statistically speaking, senior citizen students at ECU are practically nonexistent. Of the more than 15,000 undergraduate students enrolled in 1999, only two were 65 and over. Four senior adults were among the more than 3,000 students enrolled in the university's graduate programs.

No one needs to remind Potter that he's a

bit of an anomaly. The retired Pentecostal Holiness minister is sometimes mistaken for a professor instead of a student. A history major, Potter is often surrounded in class by students young enough to be his grandchildren, who are taking notes on events that have happened in his lifetime.

"Probably the most frequently asked question of me is: How do you relate to the students?" Potter said. "Well, the answer to that is: I relate very well. I am here to learn. From that standpoint, the age gap is greatly reduced."

Age is not the only gap that separates senior adults from traditional students. In general, nontraditional students – broadly defined as those 25 and older – outperform their younger counterparts in the classroom.

"It's really neat to watch the nontraditional students," said Shelly Myers, director of adult and commuter student services at ECU. "They tend to do well academically. They're very focused. The motivations are different."

Potter maintains a full schedule. In addition to what is usually a full-time course load, he still spends time in the pulpit as an interim pastor. He also builds computers, plays piano, is an amateur radio operator and a Kiwanis Club member.

"He's a marvelous advertisement for life after 70," said David Long, an assistant professor of history at ECU and one of Potter's instructors. I was impressed with his vitality, with his zest for life. He's a good student. He's always there. He's enthusiastic; he is unembarrassed about it."

After 33 years as a pastor and 11 years with the World Missions Board, the last thing Potter was looking for when he retired at the end of 1993 was a job. He and his wife, Shirley, had planned to do what so many retired couples look forward to – things like traveling, gardening, and spending time with their nine grandchildren. But Potter found retirement unsatisfying.

"I saw that just to be retired was something that gets old after a while." he said.

His search for a new challenge led him just five miles from home to the ECU campus. But the desire for a degree went much further.

After graduating from high school in New Bern, Potter had briefly attended Bible college in South Carolina. He later enrolled at Chowan College, where he made the dean's list. But with a wife, four children and a church to take care of, Potter decided his education would have to wait. He left college, but the idea of college never left him. "I have given commencement addresses in my lifetime and gone to commencement exercises," he said, "and I always felt there was something lacking." When he came to campus in July 1998, he found it. At 69, he enrolled as a freshman. "I wondered about it at his age," Mrs. Potter said. "Why? What is it for? What are you going to do with it? But he

may live to be 90 years old. His mind is so good; it's just a shame to waste it. I knew he's always wanted to go back to school. That's his dream. He's always talked about it all the 50 years I've been married to him."

Potter will have to be patient a little longer. Even though he's likely to place out of several courses, it will probably take him another two years to finish his degree. He's thought about adding religious studies as a double major or even going to graduate school. "The sad thing about it is I only have a few years left to use what I have put together," he said. "If I have a regret about all of it, I wish I had started a few years earlier."

Respected Matriarch

She was one of the eight children of Johnston County farmer Thomas Byrd and Sallie Rite Johnson Byrd. She and her youngest sister Millie are the last living of the family.

She was born in western Johnston County, attended Piney Grove School, and was always disciplined for using too much of the available oil in the lamp so she could read and study.

At a box lunch, Zeb Byrd bid for Mother

Byrd's lunch and with it got a chance to eat it with her. Their relationship began and lasted for 68 years until Mr. Byrd's death in 1980. He was 84. Married in 1916, the year before WWI, all their children were born at home. "I give credit to Jesus for the good health and long life," Mother Byrd said.

Surviving Family

Her surviving family members... Sally Wood, daughter; Z.B. Byrd, son, and wife Marie; Charles Lee, Phil, Steve, and Rodney Byrd, Sandra Daniels, Renée Wood, and Lisa Carlson, grandchildren; Callie, Ann Marie, and Covington Carlson, Zeb and Austin Byrd, Brent and David Massengill, Sandy Barnes, Phil Jr., and Lee Byrd, great-grandchildren; and Tori and Savannah Byrd, great-great-grandchildren.

Deceased family members are her husband Zeb, daughter Geneil, sons Lee Thomas and Lacy Byrd, and granddaughter Dawn Byrd.

Her favorite food is fried sweet potatoes.

Still Active

Don't let Mother Byrd's age fool you. She is still active and attends trips with her senior life group. She is a member of the American Legion Auxiliary in Benson, a gold star mother for her son, Lee Thomas' death in WWII, a 50-year member of the Banner Extension Homemakers Club, a member of N.C. Central Aglow, and she has attended all the singing conventions held yearly at the Singing Grove in Benson.

Mother Byrd was the first member of Providence Presbyterial Church and the only living charter member. She was 15 when the church was founded. Mother Byrd has taught school at Piney Grove School, and she also taught Sunday School at Pleasant Hill Church. She is currently a member of Benson PH Church and attends Gospel Tabernacle in Dunn with her daughter Sally. She is a member of the LIFE senior citizens. She's always been a hard worker, many say. Working hard

on the farm, Mother Byrd would awaken at

4 a.m. to barn tobacco. She would cook breakfast, work at the bench, and then get the vegetables.

She would then shell peas and prepare lunch. A dinner was prepared by Mother Byrd daily. The cow was milked, butter was made, and fruits and vegetables were canned. All these things Mother Byrd tended to and along with it tended to her children.

She nursed her brother-in-law Aaron until his death and also her sister-in-law Bessie for several years.

Birthday Party Held

A party was held for Mother Byrd, with guests arriving at her home in Benson bearing gifts, and the florist deliveries arrived. At 6 p.m. the long black limousines began arriving, and Mother Byrd's family members loaded into the limousines. The limousines then journeyed to Raleigh to

Swain's Steak House to continue the celebration.

Upon her arrival, Mother Byrd was greeted by the manager and was assisted by the uniformed driver. She was then escorted to the long dining room, which was a private

The birthday cake was positioned on a table decorated with numerous flowers.

The cake had the No.100 on the top and was decorated with yellow roses to match the corsage Mother Byrd was wearing. After the enjoyable meal, everyone took pictures and videos.

After several hours of partying, the limousines carried everyone home.

Charles Lee Byrd, Mother Byrd's grandson, planned the birthday celebration.

Symbolizes Social Changes

Mother Byrd symbolizes 100 years of the most dizzying social changes and technological advances in human history. She has watched women get to vote and blacks fight for civil rights. Prohibition came and went, as did two world wars during Mother Byrd's lifetime. The automobile, telephone, airplane, television, and computers have also been born. Mother Byrd watched as rockets blasted into space and segregation became integration.

"Neglected Children"


One Sunday morning, I was sitting in church looking over the congregation. There in the pews I saw faces I'd known for many years, some for just a few years, and some were very new faces. In fact, these new faces were also brand-new members in the Kingdom of God.

Then as I continued to look around, I became very sad because there were many precious faces missing in the congregation. Faces, again, that had been new to God's kingdom. The bottom line was that of those surveyed who had accepted Christ as their Savior that year, the majority had left the church after 8 weeks. LINES FROM LINDA...

Do you ever ask WHY ME? A few days ago I had a heart-searching experience because of that question! I think it is worth sharing with you.

Recently a church friend asked me to sing "Why Me?" for the homecoming service at our church the following week. I questioned him as to why he wanted me to sing that particular song since I had never sung it. He assured me that I was to sing it because it would bless someone who would be attending church that day. I don't recall if I ever actually committed to him or not. I know I did offer some excuses. However, I couldn't get his request off my mind. On Monday, I decided to see if, by chance, I might have the music. I approached my music file not expecting it to be there; but in the first folder I looked, there was the sheet music. I pulled it out and read the words. I still was not convinced that was the song to sing for homecoming service. Furthermore, I had already invited a guest singer to do special music. I was also to substitute for the soloist who usually sang a part in the choir song that morning. In my own fleshly way, I reasoned that I shouldn't sing "Why Me?" After all, I didn't want the congregation to feel I was taking over the service. Yet, I couldn't get away from his request.

At choir practice on Wednesday night, I shared my feelings with several friends and asked them to help me to pray about it. I sang through the song with the pianist, and we both wondered if it were appropriate for homecoming. I left choir practice still struggling with whether or not to sing the song. The rest of the week was no better. It haunted me all day long on Thursday. Friday it nagged at me. Finally, on Friday night, I called my pastor (Jonathon Griffin) and shared with him my dilemma. Where is the appropriate place in the service to sing this song? Would it be suited for the closing of the service as an invitational song? I just couldn't make it fit. Pastor Jonathon prayed with me that God would give me direction and peace about using the song if it were appropriate. Saturday was no better. My mind was consumed with this song. One minute, I decided to do it. The next minute, it just didn't seem right.

On Sunday morning, I got up early to finish my homecoming cooking. As I worked in the kitchen, the same uneasiness I had experienced all week hung heavy over me, but somehow, I soon found myself singing the words to "Why Me?" Then the Lord began to speak to my spirit. He reminded me of times of hurt and disappointment when I had been quick to say "Why, Lord?" My thoughts went back to a day that I had taken my father to the doctor. In his early sixties, he had already had several strokes and was in failing health. As I sat in the doctor's office waiting for him, an elderly man very spryly came in whistling and looking like the picture of health. My immediate mental response to his entering the room, was a question to God. "Why is it my Daddy who is sick? He is so young and a good man. Why couldn't he be healthy and live a long life like this old man?" I recalled other, more recent occasions when I asked, "Why is this happening to us?"

I was reminded of Job when he said he had no reason to curse God for the bad things that had happened to him when he thought of all the good things God had given him.

Then I began to relate my Whys to the good things I have experienced in life. I wondered if I had ever asked the Lord why I was blessed with four healthy children who grew up without giving us trouble when other family and friends had children who were sickly or who brought them much heartache. I didn't recall asking God why he had blessed us with our beautiful little granddaughter, Sarah Elizabeth. Oh, it is true I have thanked Him many times for these blessings, but I'm not sure I ever asked Him why.

The powerful realization hit me that most of us just take the blessings of life for granted. It is as if we just expect and perhaps even

feel that we deserve them. Then when any little thing goes awry, we are quick to challenge God with the WHY.

The powerful impact this encounter with the Holy Spirit had on me caused me to be able to go to church that Sunday assured that I was to sing the requested song. My friend had said there would be someone in the service who would be blessed by it. I didn't know who else it would bless, but it had already blessed me with a soul-searching experience.

As I stood to sing, I shared with the congregation the struggle I had with the decision to sing "Why Me?" and what God had revealed to me that morning. When I started to sing, people throughout the congregation began to weep. I understood then why I was to sing that song. A song I had never sung before. A song I didn't even like. A song that I thought was inappropriate for homecoming service. God had placed that song request in my friend's heart, and he was obedient in asking me to sing it. He was right. It did bless people in that service. There were people there to whom God needed to say the same thing He had said to me.

I share this with you because you too might need to be reminded that "WHY ME?" is an appropriate question when we enjoy the good things of life. It might just bless you to sing this song.

Why me, Lord? What have I ever done to deserve even one Of the pleasures I've known? Tell me, Lord, What did I ever do that was worth loving You Or the kindness You've shown?

Try me, Lord, If you think there's a way I can try to repay All I've taken from You. Maybe, Lord, I can show someone else what I've been through myself On my way back to You.

Lord, help me; Jesus I've wasted it so; Help me, Jesus You know what I am. But now that I know that I've needed You so, Help me, Jesus, my soul's in Your hands

CHANGING CHURCH MINISTRY

American society continues to change. Ministry must change with it. The Gospel does not change. Biblical truth is not relative. Biblical truth is absolute! However, methods of preaching the truth and evangelizing the lost do change!

Researcher George Barna has identified four areas of great change within the church world. These are as follows:

- 1. Unchurched people are less relational than churched people meaning that the typical strategy of reaching them through personal relationships may not be as effective as assumed. The benefits sought by the unchurched are quite dissimilar to those of churched adults meaning that impacting the unchurched will take more than mere marketing. There must be more intentional approaches to them. New bridges and ways of bonding must be found.
- 2. Discipleship is often ineffective because churches equate it with Bible knowledge. Barna's research found that discipleship programs that fail to instill passion for Christ in people are not likely to generate positive results. People today do not have a general and unified

knowledge of the Bible. Just to organize individual verses is not enough.

- 3. Most churches use work groups, not lay leadership teams, to facilitate ministry. Churches that use teams have less conflict, fewer full-time staff, and more extensive ministries than churches that rely on staff and work groups. Lay ministry must be preached, taught, and practical.
- 4. The typical church evaluates its ministry, but uses relatively meaningless criteria. The most common evaluation criteria are attendance, membership, revenue, ratio of pastoral staff to congregants, and square footage. Barna's research indicated that those measures are interesting but ultimately insignificant since they do not relate to the church's primary reason for existence life. The church must evaluate itself ultimately on how many people are coming to know Christ and follow Him.

Connecting: A Radical New Vision. By Larry Crabb. Nashville: Word Publishing, 1997. 221 pp. \$19.99.

Connecting. In recent times the words connection, connect, and connecting have been used in much Christian literature and conversations. For example, a pastor desires to connect with the congregation as he preaches the Word. Worshipers must connect with God in order to truly worship. Parishioners feel the need to connect with one another to gain a sense of belonging as a member of a caring

community. Prayer is powerful because it connects us to God who possesses unlimited power.

Crabb, a well-known Christian psychologist and counselor, seems to have experienced a catharsis of sorts in his understanding of treating soul-diseases and with human emotions and the psyche. Advocating that damaged psyches are not the problem, he offers a radically new way to address human needs and problems in terms of "disconnected souls." What we need to resolve the unhealthy psychological forces operating within us is connection and the benefits of a healing community. If connecting is at the center of healing, then disconnecting must be at the core of what needs healing.

Experience and Scripture teach us that the kingdom of God is all about relationships. The presence or absence of connecting forces affect the way we think and the way we behave. It's difficult sometimes to face the truth about ourselves. Some may not realize how deeply and to what extent sin has a hold on their lives. Others have difficulty in understanding the pain they feel inside. This "disconnectedness" affects our relationships.

The answer to all relationships is the Holy Spirit, who lives and abides in the Christian. He is the spiritual dynamic that enables us to connect with God, one another, and with sinners. The Spirit of God affirms, convicts, convinces, guides, intercedes, encourages, teaches, strengthens, and empowers us to relate to God, ourselves, and others with the energy of Christ. The Spirit can lead us to a deeper change where the grace of God flows freely through our lives to others, thus becoming a healing community.

I highly recommend this publication to any and all Christian workers.

Developing a Giving Church. By Stan Toler and Elmer Towns. Kansas City: Beacon Hill Press, 1999. 208 pp. \$18.99.

Money is a sensitive subject to almost everyone. Money has never been more important to Americans than it is today. A recent Gallup poll interviewed a number of families across America and asked this question: What is the biggest problem you face as a family? Fifty-six percent of the families responded that money and economic problems constitute the biggest problem they face. Will Rogers once said, "We are borrowing money we don't have to buy things we don't need to impress people we don't like." Too many Christians are trying to eat T-Bone steak on a hot dog income.

Recent statistics tell us that Americans give some \$2 billion toward missions. But Americans also buy \$4 billion worth of dog and cat food every year. Even more astonishing, Americans spend some \$5 billion a year on snuff!

The Bible has much to say about money matters because money matters. According to Toler and Towns, healthy Kingdom giving springs out of spiritual living. Designed to

take the "stew" out of stewardship, covering practically the whole spectrum on the subject of giving and tithing, *Developing a Giving Church* provides pastors, deacons, secretary-treasurers, and members of finance committees sound biblical approaches to increase giving in their churches.

A 26-year decline in giving percentages among Evangelical Churches need not discourage the Christian leader. By creating a climate of giving through proper stewardship education and shaping the thinking in the pews

with biblical principles, giving can increase. True Christians have an inner desire to be good stewards. Stewardship training teaches people how to use their money properly.

This publication offers numerous charts, cartoons, valuable quotes, stewardship sermons, and anecdotes. A valuable stewardship resource!

REVEREND BENJAMIN C. HORRELL NOVEMBER 12, 1923 - AUGUST 5, 2000

Reverend B.C. Horrell was born at a small eastern North Carolina

community called Montague. His parents were William Doyle and Tiny E. Horrell.

"Ben," as a few of us knew him, was converted to a life-changing experience in Jesus Christ in 1948. Shortly thereafter, sensing a call to preach the Gospel, he acquired mission worker's credentials in the North Carolina Conference. He received conference minister's license in 1949 and was ordained in 1951. Brother Horrell was an avid student of the Word of Rev. Benjamin C. Horrell God. In fact, he could start quoting it just



about anywhere designated. He not only could quote the Bible. He translated it into daily life. Relating to the scriptures was as natural to him as breathing. Most mornings he would quote and study several chapters before sunrise. That was his lifestyle. He loved the Word!

Pastor Horrell was the recipient of an Honorary Doctor of Divinity degree.

This pastor was a "workhorse." He refused retirement and planned to work forever. He never prepared himself to quit, and he never did

Brother Horrell served pastorates beginning in 1949. His charges in chronological order were:

Verona, Harker's Island, St. Paul, Mt. Carmel, Wilson First, and Roanoke Rapids First. His longest pastorate was his last one; he led the Roanoke Rapids First church for a little over thirty four years beginning in 1966.

Brother "B.C." enjoyed good health conditions until about five years before his death in August of this year. His son, Rev. John Mark Horrell, Rev. L. B. Avery, and I led his funeral. Services were at Roanoke Rapids First Pentecostal Holiness Church on Tuesday, August 8. The wake on Monday night and the funeral were well attended. I was favorably impressed by the large number of ministers who attended. Interment was in Cedarwood Cemetery in Roanoke Rapids.

Mrs. Margaret Horrell, his widow, continues to fight the good fight of faith. She is an extraordinarily gifted lady who is a vibrant witness to the grace of God. The Horrells have been a highly contributing family to the cause of Christ through and beyond the conference for more than fifty years. They are still very valuable to us even though the patriarch of the family has been promoted. I praise God for giving them to us.

As the East covertly embraces many aspects of

the West, and the West willingly embraces many aspects of the East, the postmodern culture presents a great challenge for Christians who claim exclusivity in terms of salvation and the way of eternal life. Religious pluralism denies the uniqueness of Jesus Christ as the only way. Is Jesus in fact God? Is Jesus the way, the truth, and the life, or should we seek for another? Why can't we take a little from Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism and special pragmatic features of other world religions and blend them together to form a holistic, all-encompassing universal faith capable of meeting the many complex needs of people and society in general? "Let tolerance prevail," we are being told these days.

Jesus Among Other Gods offers a sound and persuasive defense that the unequaled claims of Jesus Christ as God and the only way to heaven are true. Jesus is not one of many saviors. He is the only Savior of mankind. The Christian faith is not one of many faiths. It is the only true faith. All religions cannot be equally true. All prophets and religious teachers cannot be right. If Deepak Chopra is right, then Jesus Christ is wrong. Mohammed received revelations. Jesus revealed the Father. Krishna exploited the milkmaids in the Bhagavad-Gita. Jesus was completely sinless. He who knew no sin became sin for us.

One of the greatest Christian polemical minds of all time, Zacharias furnishes explanation of both Eastern and Western thought to help the reader sort out the differences and implications relative to faith and spirituality. He demonstrates that all faiths and religions cannot stand the test of truth, except the Christian faith. He proves that Jesus Christ is the single way to God.

The author wrote, "Over the years, I have become more convinced than ever that He is exactly who He claimed to be-God incarnate, who came to give us life to the fullest and to point us to the beauty and freedom of truth." This means that life apart from Jesus Christ spells death!

While a good understanding of the disciplines of philosophy and apologetics would serve as a helpful prerequisite in comprehending this book, I heartily recommend this publication to all Christians, especially those who are struggling to understand the heart and essence of the Christian faith and sharing their faith with others. May your reading be profitable and enjoyable.


SPOTLIGHT ON MEN NO MORE "WHIPPING BOYS!"



Thank God for pastors! God has made them "overseers, to feed the church of God, which He hath purchased with His own blood" (Acts 20:28). Too often, believers feel they have the right to "punish" the pastor for things happening in the church that they personally don't like. Using their tongues like a biting whip, they lash out at the pastor, unflinchingly "beating" him with their bitter words and angry attitudes. They want to make sure the pastor hears every detail of their grievances. Then they expect him to magically make the church be exactly what they think it needs to be – or else!

Pastors are our leaders, but they are NOT superhuman. They have feelings too! Instead of making the pastors "whipping boys," we should be on our knees, crying out to God on their behalf. Sincere prayer will bring solutions to many grievances and ensure our churches are what <u>God</u> thinks they need to be!

Men, I encourage you to form a pastor's prayer-partner group. Gather with your pastor before every service and lift him up before God. Remember – he is gift from God! Let your pastor know that you are standing side by side with him. Allow him to be your shepherd, but never make him your "whipping boy."

Wilson District WM Director Teresa Nelson opened the meeting by welcoming everyone. Praise and Worship was led by Pat Montgomery of Wilson. Pat Montgomery used the potter's wheel to minister and illustrated how the Master Potter can take a vessel, apply pressure, smooth out the rough edges and make a beautiful vessel for His glory. Sometimes a "crack" might appear. Then the vessel has to return to the potter's wheel to be cut down, pressure reapplied, and the vessel can still be used but not for the same purposes. The size of the vessel will be different. Pat also demonstrated how "painting" and "firing" a piece of pottery is symbolic of the anointing. It makes all the difference in how the vessel looks and how it will draw the attention of people to inspect the piece.

Door prizes provided by the Westmoreland WM group were awarded to the lucky ladies whose numbers were drawn.

Thanks to all the wonderful ladies of the Wilson District, a beautiful morning of ministry, fun, and fellowship was enjoyed by those who attended.

We can never repay these many acts of love. We shall forever remain in your debt!


The materials are reaching Zambia, Malawi, Zimbabwe, Botswana and South Africa.


Continue to pray for the girls of Africa. Their lives are much harder and circumstances so very different from the average American girl. They need the love and nurture that the GEMS program offers.
