

EXTRACTS FROM CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

CANON 43

OF THE DUE CELEBRATION OF SUNDAYS

All persons within this church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, by regular participation in the public worship of the Church, by hearing the Word of God read and taught, and by other acts of devotion and works of charity, using all godly and sober conversation.

CANON 44, Section 1

OF REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE LAITY

Section 1. A communicant in good standing removing from one parish or congregation to another shall be entitled to receive and shall procure from the Rector or Minister of the parish or congregation of his or her last residence, of if there be no Rector or Minister, from one of the Wardens, a certificate stating that he or she is duly registered or enrolled as communicant in the parish or congregation from which he or she desires to be transferred and the Rector or Minister or Warden of the parish or congregation to which such communicant may remove, shall enroll him or her as a communicant when such certificate is presented, or, on failure to procure such certificate through no fault of such communicant, upon other evidence of his or her being such a communicant sufficient in the judgment of the Rector or Minister. Notice of such enrollment in such parish or congregation to which such communicant shall have removed, shall be sent by the Rector or the Minister thereof to the Rector of the parish from which the communicant is removed.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS, CONVENTION OF 1939

FIRST DAY

Fayetteville, N. C., May 16, 1939

The Fifty-sixth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of East Carolina met in St. John's Church, Fayetteville, N. C., Tuesday, May 16, 1939.

At 5:00 P. M. the Convention met for organization and was opened with the Creed and prayers by the Bishop of the Diocese, Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D.

The Secretary called the roll and 38 clergymen, 24 parishes and 10 missions responded as follows:

A quorum being present, the Convention re-elected the Rev. Robert B. Drane, D. D. President and the Rev. W. R. Noe, Secretary.

The Rev. W. Tate Young, Rector of the Parish, made a short address of welcome and then moved that the sessions be from 9:30 A. M. to 1:00 P. M.; 2:00 to 5:00 P. M. and that the evening service be at eight o'clock, and this was adopted.

The regular committees were appointed by the Bishop. Committees were appointed by the Bishop as follows: Dispatch of Business—Rev. W. M. Latta and Mr. Robert Strange. Nominations—Rev. George F. Hill, Rev. J. Leon Malone, and Mr. Guy C. Harding.

The Bishop nominated Mr. George B. Elliott as Chancellor of the Diocese and Mr. Junius D. Grimes moved confirmation.

Adopted.

On motion, visiting clergymen and candidates for Holy Orders were given seats in the Convention.

The Bishop read the statistical part of his address. (See Appendix "A")

Mr. H. Edmund Rodgers for the Committee on Canons, pre-ented a number of changes to Canon 9, entitled "Committees".

Judge George Rountree offered an amendment to Canon 14, so as to read as follows:

CANON 14

Of The Vestry

Amend Section of Canon 14 so as to make it read as follows: SECTION I: In every parish there shall be an annual Election upon the Monday after the first Sunday in Advent, or on such day in the Advent Season as the Parish may appoint, of a Vestry, consisting of not less than three and not more than twelve members, who shall be communicants, of lawful age, and in good standing, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.

"Vestrymen shall hereafter be elected in the following manner, viz., one-third to serve for a period of one year, one-third

to serve for a period of two years, one-third to serve for a period of three years; and thereafter one-third of the number of Vestrymen shall be elected for a period of three years. No retiring Vestryman shall be eligible for re-election until there shall have elapsed a period of one year.

"No person shall serve as Vestryman until he shall have subscribed the following declaration:

"I believe that the Holy Scriptures contain all the doctrine necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ, our Lord; and I subscribe to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church."

The resolution was referred to the Committee on Canons.

A committee to prepare suitable resolutions on the death of the Rev. George S. Gresham was appointed as follows: Rev. E. F. Moseley, Rev. B. F. Huske, D. D., Mr. W. F. Joyner.

The Secretary was directed to send messages to Rev. W. H. Milton, D. D., Rev. A. H. Marshall, Rev. W. O. Cone, Rev. Robert B. Drane, D. D., Mr. E. R Conger and Mr. George C. Royall who were unable to attend the Convention on account of sickness.

The report of the standing Committee was read by the Rev. Stephen Gardner as follows:

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA FOR THE CONVENTION YEAR 1938 - 1939

The Fifty-fifth Annual Convention of the Diocese elected the following Standing Committee for the ensuing year: the Rev. Stephen Gardner, the Rev. A. C. D. Noe, the Rev. Sidney Matthews, Mr. E. R. Conger, and Mr. T. Harvey Myers.

The first meeting was held in St Paul's Church, Wilmington, May 11th, for organization. The Rev. Stephen Gardner was elected President, and Mr. T. Tarvey Myers, Secretary.

There were fifteen meetings held during the year.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Karl Morgan Block, D. D., L. L. D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of California. The Testimonial was signed by all members present, and was mailed in the first pouch of air-mail leaving Washington, North Carolina by plane, May 19, 1938.

Consent was given for the election of the Rev. Alexander Hugo Blankenship to be Bishop of this Church in the missionary District of Cuba.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Spence Burton to be Bishop Suffragan of this Church in the Missionary District of Haiti and the Dominican Republic.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Richard Ainslie Kirchhoffer to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Indianapolis.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Arthur Raymond McKinstry, D. D., to be Bishop of the Diocese of Delaware.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. John James Gravatt, D. D., to be Bishop of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina.

Consent was given to the Diocese of Chicago to elect a Bishop Suffragan.

John Sterling Armfield was recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Diaconate, the length of his candidacy was shortened to one year and ten months.

The report of the Board of Examining Chaplains was read by the Rev. Alexander Miller as follows:

Wilmington, July 24, 1938: Mr. Charles Merchant Johnson, postulant, presented satisfactory evidence of having completed the requirements for admission as a candidiate for Holy Orders under Canon 2, section V, sub-section I. It was recommended he be admitted a candidate for Holy Orders. Mr. Johnson is a graduate of St. Augustine's College, Raleigh, with an A. B. degree. He is the son of Rev. R. I. Johnson.

The Rev. E. W. Halleck and Rev. Alexander Miller, Examiners.

Report of Committee on State of the Church

1939

After this report the Rev. C. A. Ashby, Chairman of the Committee, stated that plans for raising the balance due on the diocesan debt would soon be completed.

After a report from the Rev. George F. Hill, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations and the nomination of Mr. Hill from the floor for the Standing Committee, the following were elected:

The Rev. Mortimer Glover read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

Your committee has consulted the Annual Reports of the Farishes and Missions for 1938, the files of the Mission Herald for the same year, and other records of the Diocesan Office, and has taken note of reports that have come to it from the Bishop, the Executive Council, and other Diocesan Officials.

The statistics of the Diocese do not show much change from the previous year. The recital of these figures year after year is of value only when they indicate a general trend. The only such trend noticeable this year is the continued decrease in the number of Church School scholars which has been occurring for several years past. Some of our smaller schools have shown an increase, but the Diocese as a whole continues to show the tendency toward decrease that has been the subject for alarmed comment at our Diocesan Conventions for the past several years.

We note with encouragement the employment by the Diocese of a full time Religious Education worker, as recommended by the Committee on the State of the Church in 1937 and 1933, and hope that this step will prove effective in checking the tendency toward decrease in Church School enrollment. Reports from the Diocese already indicate that this is proving a help and inspiration to Church Schools in various places.

So far as other statistics are concerned there does not seem to be much change, which may indicate as the committee stated in 1938 that "We really are slipping backward". In this connection we call attention of the Convention to the survey undertaken at its direction several years ago to discover the present status of more than 7,000 persons confirmed by Bishop Darst. This survey has now been completed and the reports are now on file in the Diocesan Office. We recommend that these reports be referred to the Commission on Evangelism for study and such action as may seem advisable to help restore lapsed communicants to an active status. It would seem from this survey that the chief cause of the slow rate of our numerical increase is the lapsing of communicants from active participation in the Church after they have been Confirmed.

Financially we note some improvement in contributions both for parochial purposes and for the Diocese and General Church, which continues the upward trend begun in 1935, but the rate of increase is far less than the rate of improvement in general business as reported by various commercial indices. The increase in diocesan receipts has practically all gone to place new workers in the field where they were desparately needed, and it has not been possible to begin gradual restoration of missionary salaries that has been hoped for each year since the low point of diocesan finances was reached in 1934. In justice to faithful workers as well as in view of the increasing cost of living, our efforts to restore at least a part of the cuts made several years ago should be continued. To accomplish this the Parishes and Missions must continue their efforts to raise the level of diocesan giving still higher than at present.

We note that payments to the Bishop's Memorial Anniversary Fund for retirement of our Diocesan Debt have slowed down considerably and we are far from our announced goal of completing this fund by the end of this year. We note, also, that a movement has begun to stimulate interest in the completion of this fund, and we hope this purpose will shortly be accomplished.

We desire to commend the Evangelistic Campaigns undertaken throughout the Diocese last year under the direction of the Commission on Evangelism. Where the plans of the Commission were carried out in full, reports indicate a high degree of success and spiritual improvement. We believe this movement should continue without abatement, as it is our most promising sign of spiritual vitality and our most effective means of promoting the Kingdom of God.

Resolutions

The Bishop asked for the privilege of reading a few paragraphs from an address which he made at the celebration in St. James', Wilmington, as a part of the Report on the State of the Church.

The Rev. Mortimer Glover invited the Convention to meet in St. James', Wilmington, on January 24, 1940, and on motion, the invitation was accepted.

The Rev. Mortimer Glover offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

RESOLVED: That a Committee of three members be appointed to meet with a similar Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese to arrange for a suitable recognition by the Diocese of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Consecration to the Episcopate of Bishop Darst.

The Bishop appointed a committee as follows: Rev. Stephen Gardner, Rev. C. A. Ashby and Mr. Robert Strange.

The Committee on Unfinished Business reported that action should be taken on the amendment to Article 4, Section 3 of the Constitution, which was adopted on first reading in the Convention of 1938 and made the order of the day for the first day of this Convention as follows:

WHEREAS, the Fifty-third Annual Convention, on May 13, 1936, adopted on first reading the amendment to Article IV, section 3 of the Constitution and made final action thereon the order of the day for the first day of the next Convention, and

WHEREAS, at the next succeeding Convention, held in Goldsboro. N. C., on May 12, 1937, the Committee on the Revision of Canons submitted for final action the said amendment, and

WHEREAS the Journal of the Convention for the said twelfth day of May, 1937, states — "The amendment to Article 4, section 3 of the Constitution was adopted," but does not recite that the same was "then approved by a majority of each of the two orders present", as required by Article XV of the Constitution,

NOW THEREFORE, in order to relieve the uncertainty as to the legality of the adoption of the said amendment to the Constitution, it is

RESOLVED, that the amendment proposed in 1936, which was in the words and figures following, to wit

"RESOLVED: That Article IV, section 3 of the Constitution be amended by striking out the word 'male' and the following words relating to the possible election of a delegate from another parish, by adding the words, 'one of whom may be a woman'.

The amended section would then read as follows:

"Each regularly organized parish or mission within the Diocese shall be entitled to be represented by one or more Lay Delegates not exceeding four, one of whom may be a woman, chosen by the Vestry from the communicants of the parish, or by the congregation of the Mission from the Communicants of the Mission. No person, clerical or lay, under ecclesiastical censure publicly declared by a competent tribunal, shall be admissable to a seat in the Convention."

be and the same is hereby readopted on first reading by this Convention.

The Rev. John R. Tolar moved that the proposed amendment be adopted. The vote was taken by orders, the elergy voting 9 for and 23 against; laymen 4 for and 46 against.

Mr. George F. Wiese of the Patterson School made an address.

On motion, the Report of the Finance Department was made the order of the day immediately after lunch.

Mrs. Louis J. Poisson presented the report of the President of the Woman's Auxiliary. (See Appendix "C".)

Mr. Richard L. Meares presented the report of the Committee on Insurance, which was referred to the Finance Department and Executive Council, as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

Wilmington, N. C., May, 15, 1939

The Committee on Insurance respectfully submit their report. for the past year.

The Diogesan schedule policy remains in the same amount as last year, viz; \$75,685.00.

Your Committee has made every effort possible to collect the amount of premiuns due by each parish and mission. We recret to inform you that there are some eight or ten who will not answer letters though they have been written five or six times.

1939 Report of Committee on Insurance

Inasmuch as the Church at Sunbury was destroyed by a tornado, your Committee has had all property insured under the Diocesan schedule inspected and have secured rates for windstorm coverage.

Your Committee are now having inspected all property insured under the schedule to ascertain if the value of the property is in conformity with the amount of the insurance thereon. This work is being performed with no cost to the Diocese.

Your Committee are prepared to cover all property under this schedule against the perils of windstorm, cyclone, tornado and hail, explosion, riot, riot attending a strike, aircraft, smoke, vehicles, at a very nominal rate. The amount of premium it would cost to put this coverage on the policy expiring August 1st, 1940, would be \$60.97. On the policy which expires in 1941 it would cost \$121.93 and on the policy to be renewed on August 1st, 1939 to expire August 1st, 1942, it would cost \$182.90. Your Committee estimates that the first year of this coverage would cost the Diocese net something less than \$200.00 and each year thereafter the net cost to the Diocese should be less than \$100.00.

This coverage contemplates the same amount of insurance on these various properties as covered by the fire insurance and the total protection under the windstorm coverage would amount to \$75,685.00.

We wish to express our grateful appreciation to all of those who have cooperated with us in the work which we are endeavoring to do. We earnestly ask a continued cooperation.

We appreciate the privilege and pleasure of serving you during the past year, and assure you that we are at your service whenever we may be called upon.

Rev. John R. Tolar made report No. 2 of the Finance Department, which was adopted, as follows:

RESOLVED: That the Treasurer of the Diocese be authorized to pay the expense to the Convention of the clergymen not yet connected with the Diocese who are now located and serving therein, and of such clergymen as may have been prevented from being present at the opening of the Convention, and also

Candidates for Holy Orders and Postulants who are now serving in the Diocese.

RESOLVED FURTHER: That the Treasurer be instructed to pay the Sexton of St. John's Church \$5.00 for services during the Convention.

A recess was taken until 2:00 P. M.

At 2:00 P. M. the Convention reasembled, the Bishop in the Chair.

The order of the day having been reached, the Rev. John R. Tolar presented the report of the Finance Department as follows:

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE

Rt. Rev. Father in God, Gentlemen:

As Chairman of the Department of Finance, I come before you today with a distinct feeling of gratification. Two years ago at Goldsboro this Diocese ended a long and very costly retreat, for the Convention authorized the adoption of a financial program of minimum needs and thus enabled the Bishop to once more turn his eyes toward the future. Under his wise and consecrated leadership, the program then launched has been progressing toward the immediate objectives then stressed. budget, which will be presented today, is a budget made necessary by accomplished progress. It does not represent future plans. It represents work actually under way. Though no material change has been made in our budgeted items during the last three years, with the exception of the one item of Missionary Stipends, fields hitherto vacant have been filled; our young people's work and Church School work have once again been supplied with the long needed especially trained leadership and adjustments in Missionary Stipends have been made where most needed. This last item is a very minor one, however. In the main, the large increase in the item 'Missionary Stipends' represents expenses of new work and stipends of new workers placed in the field and this real progress has been accomplished on a balanced budget. We closed 1938 with all bills paid and all obligations met, including our full General Church Quota. We were able to do this, however, not because the necessary minimum quotas of \$35,000 were paid, but because the present program of work was not fully functioning as it now is. shall need for this program this year \$43,766.30.

Our possible sources of income to meet this need are as follows:

This leaves, you will note, a balance of only \$92.70 with a \$35,000 quota collected one hundred per cent.

In the year just closed, Parishes and Missions paid in only \$28,000.

May I repeat, the figures I have just presented are not figures necessary for proposed work, they represent the amount needed to finance work actually being carried on NOW. Gentlemen, after long, weary years of retreat, "we have marched up the hill". Shall it be only to turn around and "march right down again"? The answer lies with this Convention. We feel sure the answer will be no. We must continue the venture for God.

The sum of \$35,000 from Parishes and Missions is not beyond the abilities of this Diocese. On the contrary, the apportionment assigned and, in most cases accepted, are reasonable. In total they average only ten cents a week per Communicant for all purposes and last year eight cents per Communicant was paid in by Parishes and Missions. An increase then of only two cents would balance the budget, and efforts along this line may be our best method of procedure. Its disadvantages, however, are obvious; no leeway for shortages and no margin for future needs, even with one hundred per cent collections. We have, therefore, placed in the agenda of this Convention a proposed change in our present financial set-up.

The support of the Episcopate should not be a charge against the Missionary funds of the Diocese. These funds represent free will offerings, voluntary gifts. The support of the Bishop in an Episcopal Church is a legal obligation. The Bishop is our Chief Pastor, the Rt. Rev. Father in God of every Communicant and provision for his support is the obligation of each Communicant and just as much a Parish obligation as is the support of the local Rector. This support should, therefore, be an assessment against Vestry funds and so recognized. Budgeted locally, a local per capita assessment for this purpose would not only strengthen the ties between the Bishop and the individual Communicant, it would also tend to widen horizons and increase a sense of responsibility to a Diocesan wide and a world wide Church.

We recommend this change then, first, because it is logical under our system of government; second, because we believe it would be spiritually beneficial.

If this change is logical and right, it should be made at this time, for not only will it lessen the chance of a deficit, but it will also provide a stronger financial basis for future growth.

We, therefore, recommend for adoption the following Budget, based on such a change:

The PROGRAM COMITTEE in 1937, through its Chairman, Rev. Alexander Miller, made the following recommendations: 1st. "That the Bishop and Executive Council take such steps as are consistent with the best interests of the Diocesan Mission work to establish Parishes and Missions receiving aid upon a self-supporting basis".

2nd. "That provision be made for the concentration of effort in such places in the Diocese that today promise unusual opportunity for the growth and development of the Church".

3rd. "That the Bishop and Executive Council take such steps as are consistent with the expressed desire of the people to establish the work of the Church in such places where it is not now established and where opportunity for this Church to serve is compelling and promising. The Department made similar recommendations last year in Wilmington.

Back of all these recommendations there is, I think, a realization that perhaps our entire program, so far as aided Par-

ishes and Diocesan Missions are concerned, needs re-thinking and re-valuation. Our present program has not unchanged in essential in forty years. Conditions have changed radically during that time. It would be strange indeed, therefore, if some of our Missionary expenditures should not need radical revision. In some fields we may be spending more than we should. Perhaps, in other fields we are not spending enough. Some fields may need re-grouping; some, perhaps,, should be closed. Some may be ready for self-support and there exist without a doubt, opportunities for new Missions in places not now served by the Church, ready to yield an abundant harvest.

But, before entering new fields and before inaugurating any sweeping changes in present fields, we should know present facts.

This Department, therefore, recommends that this Diocese undertake immediately an exhaustive and carefully made survey covering every county in the Diocese. That this survey shall include separate maps of each county, on which shall be shown location of all towns, as well as the location of existing Parishes and Missions. There shall, also, be indicated the growth and trend of the town and country population; economic and industrial developments; an estimate of the opportunities of our Church in each county, with suggestions as to stragetic locations for new Missions should such exist.

We recommend that after such a survey has been made in the manner above designated, that the material be tabulated, studied and digested and turned over to the Executive Council for its information and that its findings and recommendations be conveyed to the next Convention.

This Department feels sure that the people of this Diocese, when presented with a program of Missionary advance based on such a careful study of present conditions and needs, will provide the necesary funds for its accomplishment.

The Rev. H. F. Kloman of St. Mary's, Raleigh, presented a report as follows:

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF SAINT MARY'S SCHOOL INCORPORATED

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of incorporation the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith the report of this Board for the Academic year 1938-39.

Since the Diocesan Convention of 1938 the following important meetings of the governing boards of Saint Mary's have been held: May 26, 1938, Executive Committee; May 31st, 1938, Semi-Annual meeting of the Board of Trustees; August 26, 1938, Executive Committee; February 9th, 1939, Executive Committee; February 23rd, 1939, Executive Committee.

Since my last report two of our Trustees have passed on: The Hon. Geo. W. Connor, of the Diocese of North Carolina and the Right Rev. Kirkman G. Finlay, Bishop of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina.

The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes of the Diocese of North Carolina has been elected a Board member and member of the Executive Committee; Mrs. A. B. Stoney of Morganton, North Carolina has joined the Board as Representative from the Diocese of Western North Carolina and the Rev. Maurice Clarke of Camden, South Carolina, has become a member of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina.

During the summer of 1938 an extensive painting and refurnishing program was carried out adding materially to the happiness and comfort of the students. A Utility and playroom was developed on the third floor of Holt Hall which has been greatly enjoyed during the present session. In the Infirmary and Annex new rift pine floors have been laid and needed furnishings added.

Library Expansion: An extended study of this subject has resulted in a decision to devote the entire first floor of the Art

Building to library use, the necessary changes to begin immediately after the close, May 30, of the present session. This will necessitate rearrangement of class room space, chiefly on the first floor of West Wing. Already a new studio for the head of the Music Department has been added to the Music Building, all of the old dilapidated out-buildings have been removed and a building for the storage of school supplies is under construction.

Progress has been made in the landscaping of the campus and a new entrance has been opened from College Avenue. (Fire Protection Program.)

The 1938-39 session opened on September 15th with a capacity enrollment. To date the registration of 221 Resident Students and 77 Day and Special Students have been accepted. The session has been a most satisfactory one from all view points.

Twenty-one states are represented in Resident Student enrollment with also one student each from China and the East Indies. North Carolina leads with all students, then in order come Virginia, 55; Georgia, 12; South Carolina, 9; Washington, D. C., and Alabama, 6 each; New York and Pennsylvania, four each; Ohio, Maryland, Florida, three each; Texas, Mississippi, West Virginia, New Jersey, Tennessee and Colorado, two each; with Oklahoma, Louisiana, Kentucky, California also represented by one registration.

The strong work of the Special Departments has been marked this year by a number of distinctions:

The Department of Dramatics won first prize in its class in the State wide contest at Chapel Hill.

The Home Economics Department won first prize over all contestants in a State-wide contest held in Raleigh in April.

The Art Department won three individual first prizes in water color and drawing at the State wide contest at Chapel Hill.

A Saint Mary's student won first prize in singing in the State wide Music contest held in Greensboro.

The 1938 Annual was awarded first prize in its class at the recent Press Conference in Greensboro.

Of our total enrollment, Resident and Day Students, the religious denominations represented are: Episcopal, 165; Methodist, 49; Presbyterian, 35; Baptist, 25; Christian, 8; other denominations Roman Catholic, Lutherans, Reform.

As this report is written we have accepted 186 applications of returning and new students for the 1939-40 session which opens in mid-September, assuring another capacity enrollment. Of this number 106 are returning students.

My dear Mr. Noe:

It is our custom to send out a letter each year containing information of a general nature which may be of interest to the Convention in each Diocese and Missionary District, concerning the progress of the Church Pension Fund. This letter is intended for that purpose.

Some individuals may think of the Church Pension Fund simply as an organization which collects pension assessments and they may not appreciate that its main function is that of a disbursing agency in the payment of pen-For instance, the pension assessments payable to the Fund amount to about \$1,000,000 a year. On the other hand, the Fund is now paying out pensions at the rate of about \$1,350,000 a year, being able to do this because it is operated upon a reserve basis in which interest and various other elements are taken into consideration. At the end of 1918 the Annual Pension Roll stood at only \$275,000. Ten years ago it was \$765.00. Altogether the Fund has paid out pensions in excess of \$16,000,000 since it started and, in the meantime, through the operation of the reserve basis, its assets have grown to approximately \$33,000,000, all of which will be needed in the payment of future pensions.

It may interest you to know that, although the pension assessments payable each year in your Diocese amount to approximately \$5,200, The Fund is now paying pensions at the rate of \$11,016 per annum.

The Trustees are still continuing the program of expanding the benefits beyond the original promises. As you know, this program includes the immediate \$1000 grant to the widows of clergymen whose pension assessments have been properly paid and who die in the active service of the Church. It also includes an increased scale of pensions, so that in normal cases it can generally be considered that the minimum Age Allowance is now \$1000 as opposed to the original promise of \$600. Of the total

pensions payable to those for whom pension assessments have been received, approximately 40 per cent represents increases voluntarily granted by the Trustees in excess of the basic promises as set forth in the Rules. It should be understood, however, that this general program of expanding the benefits of the fund beyond the basic obligations is necessarily dependent upon the financial status of the Fund and, therefore, the Trustees' Resolutions from which these increases derive their authority have to be reviewed annually. It is our hope and expectation that this program will not have to be interrupted.

The status of the assessment payment is, of course, of vital importance. If the assessment system should break down, the entire structure of the Fund would be so seriously undermined that not only the extra benefits would have to be discontinued, but the basic promises would be impaired. Fortunately, Church seems to recognize this fundamental principle, and the pension assessments are keeping up the remarkable record of To illustrate the extraordinary manner in which the Church has discharged this pension obligation towards its clergy, the Fund has received, since its inception, approximately \$21,000,-000 in pension assessments. Against this the total arrears in pension assessments due still from the Church for any period through the end of 1937 is now only about \$49,000, or approximately onefourth of one per cent. of the total payable. We are constantly reducing even this small balance which is made up of various items some of which go back a great many years.

I am enclosing herewith a list of the pensions which the Fund is now paying to beneficiaries in the Diocese of East Carolina. I believe that you are already familiar with the status of any unpaid pension assessments but I would be very glad to supply you with any detailed information that you may want.

It is difficult to express adequately my own appreciation and that of the other Trustees of the Fund for the cooperation and assistance which we have received from you and from the other diocesan officials as well as from the clergy and the parish treasurers. The Church Pension Fund is a cooperative enterprise. So long as it continues to receive the support of the Church as a whole, the present and future beneficiaries of the Fund can, I think, look forward with confidence to the carrying out of the promises of pensions in accordance with the provisions intended by the Church.

The Rev. R. I. Johnson made the report of the Good Shepherd Hospital for colored people at New Bern, as follows:

1939 Report on Good Shepherd Hospital

REPORT TO THE ANNUAL CONVENTION ON THE GOOD SHEPHERD HOSPITAL FOR COLORED PEOPLE, NEW BERN, N. C.

I closed my last year's report with an expression of gratitude to Almighty God that after long and patient effort our hope of the erection and operation of a hospital for colored people in the name of our Lord and this Church was about to be fulfilled; for the building had been completed, the equipment was being installed, and plans were just about completed for the cornerstone laying and dedicatory services by Bishop Darst. course, on June 26th, these services were held in the presence of a large crowd of white and colored people from many parts of the state, the occasion being honored with the presence of a large number of priests and distinguished laymen of the The Rev. Mr. Braithwaite gave an appropriate opening sermon at St. Cyprian's in the morning, and Bishop Darst presided over the impressive program in the afternoon. Music for the occasion was rendered by the Federal Music Project under the direction of Madam Hunter, Distinguished colored artist of fame on the American and European concert Mayor Chadwick spoke for the City of New Bern, Dr. Shreiner for the Diocese of Penna., a letter was read from the Duke Endowment; the Rev. W. R. Noe for the Board of Trustees; Mr. E. K. Bishop for the Building Committee; the Rev. Mr. Williams for the Equipment Committee; Rev. Messrs. Larkins and McIver for the white and colored Churches; Dr. Wadsworth and Dr. Fisher for the white and colored doctors: Mr. I. H. Smith for colored citizens; and Miss Edith Anderson and the secretary for the hospital staff. It was a never-to-be-forgotten occasion, impressive to the highest degree to all who were present. May we take this opportunity to place in the record our profound sense of gratitude to all who came and encouraged us with their presence on that blessed day which marked the inauguration of this notable work of God by the Diocese of East Carolina, vindicating anew to all the world the purpose of the Church to minister to all the needs of the vast multitude of this race within this jurisdiction. No such expression could begin to be complete without a word of appreciation of the confidence encouragement of Bishp Darst which have been an unfailing inspiration, likewise of the constant solicitude and activity of the Rev. Mr. Noe to whom it has never been too often, nor has the distance been too long to give his strength in Through many a long and anxious helping us to do our work. mile we have wandered over the eastern seaboard from south

to north and back again to find the means with which to make ends meet and solve the ever pressing new problems arising in this, for us, new fields of interest and endeavor. His calm courage and unswerving faith have been a refuge, a rock and a deliverance. My experiences with him have taught me to know personally what most of you must have known always, his never resting, never tiring, energy and devotion to the Church and all that she does; and this Convention marks nearly ten years of his identification with this movement. Another power in the life of the hospital has been the cooperation of the Rev. Mr. Williams, chairman of our administrative board, the rather unique arrangement we have at the Good Shepherd for distributing the personnel and ironing out difficulties routine life of the hospital. Mr. Williams' sound sense, some sympathies and keen interest have been a major factor in keeping the machinery in smooth operation. There have been difficulties at times when some of us were away with which Mr. Williams has dealt with such understanding and firmness as to make his presence there a blessing to us all. So, when I reckon up today the forces that have been potent in our work, under God, I thank him for these three men of good will.

What we are doing has been called a unique venture in interracial cooperation. White members of the medical fraternity have worked with our colored men, and among all of them white and colored, including the nurses and minor help, courtesy and forbearance have prevailed. Dr. Walter F. Hughes of State Health Department says that we have the best set-up for this type of work, to be found in the state. On a recent tour in four states for the Speakers Bureau of the National Council, our scheme was hailed with surprise and commedation whereever I told of our work. So here is one place where interracial good will has passed from the expresion of hopeful sentiments to realistic accomplishment, and as so many of us might have wished, under the inspired auspices of the Church. So, today, we thank God for Drs. Duffy, Wadsworth, Kafer and Ashford; and Drs. Fisher, Mann, Martin and Mumford. These great white physicians and surgeons are withholding nothing in their willingness to help these colored men to serve their people with the fine facilities this Church has provided for them. The hospital has not only made for cordial relations between the white and colored members of the profession but also between the whites themselves who have found a common field of service to the unfortunate through this agency, and joy in rendering that service.

1939

The total cost of the Good Shepherd Hospital with the equipment was around \$68,000. When we reported last, we were deeply concerned with the raising of the \$5,000 of indebtedness on the equipment. All of the time since then, we have been struggling with this obligation hoping to be able to report to this Convention that the entire amount had been paid before the hospital is one year old. Although the entire amount has not yet been raised, a gift of \$3,000, within the last week from Miss Mary Johnson of Cincinnati, whose gifts to the hospital now total \$6,500., brings us sufficiently near our goal to hope that other sources now in sight will make it possible for us to declare ourselves free of debt by the date of the anniversary of the dedi-We have greatly desired to be able to cation of the hospital. point to this accomplishment as a foundation for our plea for your support and encouragement in the future; for as yet, we have not gone to the people of the Diocese for assistance to any considerable extent. We are grateful for supplies from the Supply Department of the Woman's Auxiliay, as well as for furnishings of our emergency and clinical wards, and to young people in the field of the Rev. A. C. D. Noe for similar contributions, and would respectfully ask that all of our diocesan organizations in looking about for worthy objects of their interest might remember this agency which we have created at New Bern in the name of our people which can never go on without a large number of friends who will help us. "Friends of the Good Shepherd Hospital" is the name of the growing group we are now creating, of people here and there who will make annual contributions for this work. We have hoped that in most of our Parishes and Missions, both whi'e and colored, we might secure the cooperation of the clergy and branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in adding members to this group, who from year to year will make small gifts for our current expense fund. How necessary this is may be known from the fact that in no month has the hospital supported itself, and although we have met the constant deficit from month to month it has been a matter of considerable concern to Mr. Noe and the rest of us. The people who need us most are least able to pay for the treatment we give them. From January 1st, 1939, we had given 1,164 free days of care at a cost of \$3.42 per day. Duke Endowment gave us \$1.00 per day, leaving \$2.42 to be found elsewhere. Through the mercy of God we have not failed, but a large number of "Friends of the Good Shepherd Hospital" will not only lighten the strain of going, but will make it possible for us to expand our activities in the interest of public health. The N. C. State Department of Health bulletin for March carries a picture of the hospital and tells of the usefulness we have al-

eady been to the public health program in our section of the east. Our clinical department is used by the local health authorities in many ways.

And there are other ways of helping, such for instance, as the inquiry which came to us recently from the Social Service Department of the Woman's Auxiliary of St. George's Church, Lake Landing, which is planning to assist in getting a colored woman from Hyde County into the hospital. There are great possibilities of assistance in this way.

There are great potentialities of friendly help among our Church people which we are confident will not fail us, and among non-Church people also, for this institution serves all without religious or social distinction, and from any part of this eastern country. Patients are beginning to come to us from several adjoining counties.

Since our last meeting the white people of New Bern have given around \$1.500 and just the other day the colored people again showed their appreciation as we observed "Hospital Day" by bringing innumerable cans and pounds of food and small gifts of money. A number of friends of Christ Church also joined us in this effort. Hundreds of visitors came and senior boys and girls from the High School as well as adults were instructed in the functions of the human body, personal hygiene, and in home nursing of the sick.

Surely God will bless the Church for her loving zeal in touching the wounds of these thousands, who serve her people in numerous personal ways, with the grace of healing love. We ask your prayers and continued interest and support as we strive to carry on.

The Rev. E. F. Moseley offered a resolution of thanks, which was adopted as follows:

RESOLVED: That this Convention express to the Rector, Wardens, Vestry, and congregations of the local parishes, their thanks for the fine hospitality shown to us during the same.

The Secretary presented the report of the Trustees of the Diocese. (See Appendix "D")

Rev. W. R. Noe made a report for the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution.

After prayer, hymn and benediction, the Convention adjourned.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS



BISHOP'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of East Carolina.

"Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ."

Fifty-one years ago this month, the fifth annual Council of the Diocese of East Carolina met in St. John's Church, Fayetteville, and as we meet here today for our fifty-sixth annual Convention, I can find no better words with which to begin my address than those uttered by the saintly Bishop Watson a half century ago. "By God's mercy we are spared to meet again in brotherly consultation upon the work He has placed in our hands. Let us strive to conduct our conference with perpetual reference to His Sovereignty and our brotherhood; and may His Spirit guide us in all our deliberations."

That noble admonition of our first Bishop needs to be sounded to-day as we meet in a time of confusion and fear and world unrest, when strange new leaders are building barriers of hate and misunderstanding and racial prejudice in all parts of the world.

At such a time, we must re-emphasize the Sovereignty of God and the brotherhood of the Christian family if we are to play any part in bringing peace and understanding fellowship to the world in which we live.

May God, the Holy Spirit, guide us as we face the dangers and the opportunities of our day. May God, the Holy Spirit, inspire us with courage, faith and confidence as we give ourselves to the glorious task of building a new world in which peace shall prevail and righteousness reign.

At such a time as this, we must take stock of our resources, and make an honest appraisal of our assets, material and spiritual, in order to determine whether or not we are adequately equipped for the task committed to our hands.

We should also have a clearer picture of the task so that we may have a more intelligent idea of just what God wants us to do, and a more definite appreciation of the value of the undertaking to which He is calling us.

If the work that we are trying to do in East Carolina is worth while, if we are really extending the Kingdom of God in this territory for which He has made us responsible, we should support that work with our money and our service.

If it is not worth while, if we are wasting our resources on hopeless projects, or neglecting real opportunities in order to minister to little groups here and there who have no vision beyond a sentimental attachment to tradition, we should revise our entire program and build one based on the crying NEEDS of neglected people rather than on the WANTS of those who look upon their local Church not as a Divine agency for the extension of God's Kingdom, but as something that must be preserved for the happiness and well being of its members.

It is our hope that these matters may be honestly faced at this Convention, and that following free and frank discussions, we may be able to appoint a committee on policy and evaluation who will make a careful study of the work now being carried on in the Diocese and submit a report, with recommendations, to the next meeting of the Convention.

There is much room for improvement; there are weak places that should be strengthened, dependent places that should be taught to stand on their own feet, new places that should be entered and held for Christ and his Church; but in spite of our failure to measure up to our ideals, we have reason to thank God and take courage as we consider the record of the Diocese during the past year.

Negro Work

Our greatest missionary opportunity is in connection with the large Negro population in East Carolina, and while we have done nothing more than touch the fringes of this great task, the results have been out of all proportion to the money and time expended on our sixteen Negro congregations. This work is being carried on by six Negro Priests, who are supported in part by the National Church, and two white Priests, who in addition to their regular parochial duties, minister to three colored Missions.

During the past year the Confirmations in the Colored Churches represented ten percent of the total number of Communicants and the contributions of those Churches to the missionary work of the Diocese and General Church was 75 percent of the amount of their promises.

Since our last Convention, a new and promising Mission has been established in Sladesville, Hyde County, and on a recent visit, I Confirmed thirteen persons, and admitted this new group as a Diocesan Mission, under the name of St. Thomas.

Two of our fine young Colored men are members of the middle class at Bishop Payne Divinity School, and we must make it possible for them to be used in presenting the Church to neglected and hopeful fields of opportunity when they graduate in June, 1940.

The Good Shepherd Hospital at New Bern is proving to be a blessing to the sick and afflicted and is justifying in a wonderful way the wisdom of those who have toiled through the years in order that this Christ-like service might become a living, loving part of our Diocesan life.

A few years ago, we received nearly five thousand dollars a year from the National Church for our Negro work. We are now receiving twenty-five hundred dollars a year, with the possibility of another serious cut in the appropriation. In view of the uncertainty of this yearly grant, and in order to emphasize our own responsibility for our own missionary opportunity, I would recommend that we gradually take over the entire support of our Negro work on the basis of at least five hundred dollars a year until we assume the full amount now coming from the National Church. If this plan is adopted, it must be with

the understanding that the Negro parishes and missions must assume a larger measure of self support in order that we may enter new fields of service.

Condition of Diocese as a Whole

While we are not complacently satisfied with the progress made in the Diocese as a whole during the past year, we feel that we did go forward along many helpful lines.

The Woman's Auxiliary under the leadership of the new President, Mrs. Louis J. Poisson, and her Diocesan officers, has gone forward with fine zeal and constructive activity, sounding the note without which the Church has no real reason for existence, the great note, sounded by the risen and triumphant Son of God, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel."

Surely, for the loyal, loving, sacrificing service of the women of East Carolina, we can thank God and take courage.

We also report that one of, if not the most important departments of our Diocesan life—Religious Education—has taken on new life and meaning during the past year under the efficient and consecrated leadership of our new Director of Religious Education, Miss Catherine Sherman. Miss Sherman has much to contribute to the growth and development of our Church Schools and to youth programs in our Diocese. I trust that she may be given the opportunity to serve all of our parishes and missions during the coming years.

Prospects for the continued growth and increasing usefulness of Camp Leach have never been more encouraging, and we commend to the generous and sympathetic interest of all our people this Diocesan center where, under the guidance of God, we are endeavoring to train our young people in Christian citizenship and to inspire them to take their full joyful part in the building of His Kingdom on earth.

The most beautiful happening in our Diocesan life during the past year was the erection of "The Mary Nelson

Smith Memorial Fund" by her children, grandchildren and other relatives, who in loving memory of her gracious and useful life have given the sum of \$5,000.00, the interest of which will be used in assisting young men from East Carolina in their preparation for the Sacred Ministry.

The Diocese gladly accepts this trust with grateful appreciation of the beautiful life of that saintly woman, affectionately known as Mrs. "Polly" Smith, who was the inspirer and builder of St. Luke's Church, Winterville, and whose blessed spirit lives in the loyal, useful lives of her son, the Rev. Claudius F. Smith, her grandsons, Rev. William E. Cox, and Rev. Harvey A. Cox, her grand-daughter, Venetia Cox, who has demonstrated that brave spirit in war torn China, and those other children and grandchildren who have and are serving Christ in this and other states.

We are happy to report an increase in Confirmations during the past year; the continued loyalty and devotion of our Clergy; the renewed spirit of active service on the part of our laymen's leagues and clubs; the response to the call of the Church on the part of our people that made it possible to pay our full "Expectations" to the work of Christ throughout the world, and to finish the year without increasing our Diocesan debt.

I am also very happy to report that, responding to the fine call of the Presiding Bishop, we have paid, cheerfully and gladly, our full share of the three hundred thousand dollar shortage, which I am glad to say, we did not help to create.

The most hopeful, significant, and under God, the most far reaching endeaver undertaken during the past year was the Evangelistic Program, so wisely planned by the Rev. J. R. Rountree and his associates on the Diocesan Commission on Evangelism. Preaching Missions have been held in a large number of our parishes and missions, and it is hoped that the program will be continued until these special services with their high call to repentance

and surrender and reconsecration will be sounded in every congregation in East Carolina.

A weary, distressed people want to know the way to peace and sanity and security from fear. If the Church be true to its Master, it can, and please God, it will show the way. Distrustful of human leaders, the people are waiting for you and me, my brothers, to say "Thus saith the Lord God". It is a terrible day for the preacher who has no message but a cry of despair, but it is a grand and glorious day for the preacher who lives so close to Christ that he is able to interpret His victorious life and transmit His saving power to those wistful, seeking souls who crowd the highways of life at this high, dangerous hour.

Our Task

Finally, my beloved people, I call you, as I call my own soul, to loyal, loving cooperation with God in the building of His Kingdom; to the high joy of sharing with Him in His plans for making perfect the purpose for which Jesus counted it worth His while to die.

The time for action is NOW. Today, from the noise and confusion and hate and fear of a broken, unhappy world, God calls us from our littleness, our selfishness, our complacent worldliness to service under His banner.

Drive away despair, banish any thought of defeat. God reigns. We are his sons. Victory is certain.

HIS Kingdom, broken by the sin and treachery of men, must be rebuilt. In our hearts, in our homes, in our Diocese, His Kingdom of love and peace must be established.

"Thine, O Lord, is the greatness, and the power, and the glory, and the victory, and the majesty: for all that is in the heaven and earth is thine: Thine is the Kingdom, O Lord, and Thou art exalted as head above all."

Do we believe it? Do we mean it? Then in God's name let us allow Him to lift our little lives to the splendor of His greatness as we build with Him a kingdom in which the weary world may find eternal peace.

APPENDIX "C"

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA

Right Reverend Father in God, and Members of the Diocesan Convention:

It is with peculiar pleasure that I greet you on this, the fifty-sixth Annual Convention of our Diocese, and present my first report to you. We feel that the work of the Woman's Auxiliary should be of great interest to the men (both clergy and lay) of the whole diocese as it is not simply a Parochial organization. We are the women of the church organized for work—not only in the Parish—but in the Diocese, the Nation, and the World.

Looking back over the work acomplished during the past year, that of 1938, I am deeply conscious of the inadequacy of words to express the spiritual growth evidenced in the Woman's Auxiliary. This to me is of far greater value than increase in financial statistics. As one would expect—with the former, the latter is inevitable.

Perhaps the best vista of the work could be obtained by referring to each of the Departments and showing its individual contributions to the Forward March of the Auxiliary work in the Diocese of East Carolina.

There are strong indications that the work of the Christian Educational Department has advanced. Many of the reports sent in to this Department from the Auxiliaries told of an increase in interest and fellowship in the Educational Work. The Educational Department underlies all of the work of the Auxiliary. We realize that unless our women know the need and the way to meet that need they will not care. We feel that the Woman's Auxiliary can be a real educational force in the Church because through the Educational Department we can increase interest in the Church and devotion to its mission. We feel that the educational work should not be confined to the Woman's Auxiliary, as is the case at present, but there should be a unified educational pro-

gram embodying the entire parish—beginning with the Church School and including all organizations for men, women and children. We are certain that if the men of the Church were as well informed about its missions as the women, there would be no such things as deficits. We do not merely ask for the cooperation of the Rectors in this matter, but make a definite request that each of you take some concerted action towards the education of your parish. This can be accomplished in many ways—by sermons from the pulpit, joint program meetings of the men and women, which should be definitely interesting, definitely instructive, definitely inspirational, and definately promotional—that is, tied up with action.

The Department of Christian Social Relations has spent another year in ministering to human needs, studying social problems, and in visiting the sick, the aged, the lonely, and the prisoners. Gifts amounting to \$4,440 have been made. Two-thirds of this amount was actual MONEY spent for relief. For the first time in four years we have volunteers in Life Service—two young women, Miss Mary Tankard, of Bath, and Miss Alice Meade Cranmer, of Wilmington. There has been an increase in the number of programs held on the work, with a wider scope of subject matter studied. This definitely indicates a broadening of the Social consciousness. We have undertaken in this Department a plan for the coming year in which we especially emphasize three things, (1) cooperation with local social agencies, not only in financial aid but in moral support and sympathetic interest, (2) cooperation with other communions. In this day we are thinking along lines of Christian Unity, and we can put our ideas into practice along social lines. Much can be accomplished by joining hands with woman of other denominations in studying social problems and in standing together on social legislation. And (3), the strengthening of our own spiritual lives. We realize that we can do a great deal in social legislation and other forms of secular

activity, but we must realize that only the Church can lead to a thorough regeneration.

I should like to call to your attention the reorganization of the Field Department in the Woman's Auxiliary. You will note the term re-organization is used. This Department functioned most efficiently for six years but was discontinued during the last seven years. After a deep study and after attending the National Field Department Conference in Atlanta, where all Diocesan Presidents were urged to organize Field Departments, we decided to re-organize this department of the Woman's Auxiliary, and a chairman was appointed. The work of this department is to cooperate and help all other departments. It strives to make membership in the Church productive by promoting the program of the Church, and through information to set before the members the appeal of the needs and opportunities of the Church's task. department was organized only last August, but already it has made a great contribution to the work.

During the past year there has been more interest shown in publicity. Through the courtesy of the Executive Secretary of the Diocese the Woman's Auxiliary has been given a minimum of two pages in the Mission Herald. This has been a great help in getting information to our women. At every opportunity the Publicity Department urges that members of the Church subscribe to the Church Papers.

One of the cooperating agencies of the Woman's Auxiliary is the Church Periodical Club. Through magazines and literature distributed the Church Periodical Club feeds the hungry and shows friendly interest to the lonely and sick. As a diocese we are not answering the call of the Church Periodical Club in the way we should. There are 2,000 unanswered requests for magazines to be sent to bring a little light to someone who is in darkness. We are hoping that the coming year will see advancement in this department.

As the clergy are well aware, the Supply work, which is one of the groups working in the Department of Missions, is a missionary and an educational project. Missionary, because we supply the missions and the workers in both foreign and domestic fields with not only new clothes but also with bed linens, blankets, etc. Educational, because the Auxiliary makes a special study of the field to which the box is going and the particular needs and problems of the missionary. The fact that each Auxiliary has a different field every year makes the women familiar with all the missionary work of the Church.

The work of this department has increased, but spiritually and materially. During 1938 the women of the Auxiliary of this Diocese sent to Thompson Orphanage 46 boxes of new clothing, amounting to \$1,127.91. They sent 54 boxes to missionaries at the request of the National Secretary, amounting to \$406; 15 boxes to the diocesan work along the Inland Waterway, amounting to \$72; 7 boxes to the Bureau of Supplies, to be called for by our institutions, amounting to \$104.71; 9 boxes to other missionaries, amounting to \$123.74; making the Supply Work for the year total \$1,834.36.

We women of the Church wonder if the men of the Church realize the great work which is being done by the United Thank Offering—another group working in the Department of Missions. As you know, this offering is presented twice a year in every parish in the Church—thousands of women uniting in one corporate Communion, gladly making contributions of prayers and gifts and joyful service for the work of Christ and His Church. One must search far to find a parallal to the record of the United Thank Offering. There is no one endeavor in the history of the Church today so striking in growth and so far reaching in influence. The first United Thank Offering, presented fifty years ago, was \$2,000. Last triennial it amounted to \$87,092. Through the United Thank Offer-

ing more than 400 women have been sent to the mission field as teachers, nurses, doctors, etc., and it pays not only the salaries of these workers, but pays for their training and equipment, and also a pension fund is provided for their old age. It pays the salary of Bishop Rowe of Alaska, and it has built hospitals, churches and schools In this diocese the offering in throughout the world. 1938 has increased very close to 17 percent over 1937. We wish to bring the following to the particular attention of the clergy: although this offering is large, it represents gifts from only a small percentage of our women to far the greater number the United Thank Offering is unknown. If each of these women would join in this great offering it would reach a figure far beyond anything we have yet attained and open many doors of opportunity. Realizing the great contribution the United Thank Offering has made to the missionary work of the Church, our national officers have requested that hereafter this service be held in the parishes during the regular Sunday morning service and that the rector preach on the United Thank Offering at that service. not only reach more women but will give opportunity to anyone desiring to make some memorial contribution. We feel assured that every rector will comply with the request of the National Church.

APPENDIX "E"

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

Wilmington. N. C., January 31, 1939.

The Executive Council of the Diocese met in St. James' Parish House, Wilmington, at 10:30 A. M., January 31, 1939.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Bishop.

The roll was called showing the following present: Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D. and Rev. W. R. Noe, members Ex-officio. Rev. E. F. Moseley; Rev. George S. Gresham; Mr. George B. Elliott; Mrs. W. O. S. Sutherland; Rev. John R. Tolar; Mr. W. G. Gaither; Mrs. H. G. Walker; Rev. Alexander Miller and Mrs. L. J. Poisson.

A message was received from Mr. George C. Royall stating that he was unable to attend on account of sickness. Mr. J. A. Moore wired that he was prevented from attending by weather conditions. It was reported that the Rev. Mortimer Glover was holding a mission in Emmanuel Church, Farmville and that Mr. W. B. Campbell was in Raleigh on account of an important legal engagement.

The Bishop stated that there was a possibility of securing an assistant Rector at Chapel Hill in June of this year.

The Treasurer of the Diocese, the Rev. W. R. Noe, presented his report, which was referred to the Department of Finance.

The Rev. John R. Tolar, Chairman of the Department of Finance, presented his report and the recommendations were adopted as follows:

The Department of Finance regrets to report that the parishes and missions of the Diocese failed to meet the \$35,000.00 which they assumed as their minimum responsibility for the work of the Diocese and General Church during 1938. We received some increase over the previous year but the receipts from this source were nearly \$7,000 below the hoped for goal. Had this differ-

ence been received, it would have taken care of most of our obligations to the General Church and released badly needed funds for the missionary program of the Diocese. However, we were able to pay our full quota of \$7,000 to the General Church and to close the year without an increase in the Diocesan debt through the use of funds received after the close of our books.

The Department recommends:

1st: That the minimum responsibility of the parishes and missions be continued at \$35,000 during 1939 and we urge the necessity of the realization of this goal if a deficit at the end of the year is to be avoided. Even with the utmost economy, stipends for our missionary and educational work will show a substantial increase over last year because fields which have been vacant have been filled and the larger program for our young people adopted by the last Convention is now functioning under the fine leadership of our new Secretary for Young People's work.

2nd: As the quotas of aided parishes and missions are, in most cases, well within reach, we recommend that serious consideration be given to the necessity of adjustments in appropriations in places where these quotas are not being met.

3rd: That the Committee on Appropriations again make a study of present appropriations to all aided fields.

4th: The support of the Episcopate and certain other canonical items of Diocesan support should not be a charge against the missionary funds of the Diocese. The item of Episcopal maintenance of this Church is just as much a parish obligation as the salary of the Rector, or any parish expense. We recommend therefore, that, in keeping with the practice of every other Diocese of the United States, these items be made a direct assessment on the parishes and missions, beginning January, 1940. That the consideration of this change be placed on the agenda of the next Convention and that the parishes and missions be so notified when the call for the election of delegates is issued.

5th: That immediate steps be taken to bring to a conclusion during 1939 the Bishop's Memorial Anniversary Fund, thus wiping out the Diocesan debt and eliminating the burdensome yearly interest charge.

6th: The present system of diocesan bookkeeping—a heritage from the past, is unnecessarily complicated. We recommend that this system be simplified in the interest of clarity and that a committee, consisting of the Treasurer, Auditor and Chairman of the Department of Finance, be appointed for this purpose. A more understandable picture presented to the people of the Diocese would stimulate greater interest in our financial problems.

7th: In order to give more opportunity for study, and suggestions as to possible budget adjustments for the ensuing year, we recommend that the yearly report of the Treasurer be placed in the hands of each member of the Executive Council two weeks before the opening of every Diocesan Convention.

8th: That we again accept as our goal of endeavor for the year 1939, the sum of \$7,000 for the work of the General Church.

On recommendation of the Department of Finance, it was decided to accept \$200.00 as our apportionment for the Provincial Synod for 1939.

The Rev. George S. Gresham, Chairman of the Department of Religious Education, presented the financial needs of that Department for 1939 as follows:

On recommendation of the Department of Finance, the Bishop was authorized to make arrangements to take care of the needs of the Department of Religious Educa-

tion and to make some necessary adjustments in the salaries of the missionary clergy.

At the request of Mr. George B. Elliott, Chairman of the Department of Missions and Church Extension, it was decided to continue the appropriation of \$50.00 a month for the work along the Inland Waterway and to appoint a Committee to make every possible effort to secure an additional \$300.00 for this work.

The following recommendation of the Department of Publicity, the Rev. Mortimer Glover, Chairman, was approved and then referred to the Annual Convention for the necessary change in Canon 9, entitled "The Executive Council".

"The National Council of the Church has found it advisable to combine the Departments of Field and Publicity and it would seem that the same reasons that operate to make this advisable in the National Council would apply even more to the smaller unit of the Diocese. I, therefore propose that this department introduce in the Executive Council a resolution that the Executive Council take appropriate steps to recommend to the Diocesan Convention further amendments to the Diocesan Canons to provide for the combination of the present departments of Field and Publicity, and that the provision for separate existence of the Publicity Department be eliminated from the Canons, so that the normal policy of the Diocese will be to conduct all publicity through the Field Department."

At the request of the Bishop, Miss Catherine Sherman told something of her plans for work in the Diocese during the coming year.

A letter from Dr. John W. Wood of the Department of Foreign Missions of the National Council, asking if we would like to undertake to designate in our offerings on account of the diocesan expectations, the amount of Miss Westphal's salary, viz. \$1,125.00 (\$1,250.00 less 12 percent), was given very careful consideration and then referred to the Annual Convention.

Minutes of Executive Council

May

A letter from the Secretary of the vestry of St.

Matthew's Church, Houma, La. requesting the names and addresses of persons who might want to have a part in the erection of an organ as a memorial to the late rector of the parish, the Rev. G. L. Tucker, D. D., was given careful consideration. The Secretary was directed to write Mr. Stevenson that, on account of a number of special appeals being made at this time to the people of the Diocese, it might be well for us to wait until a later date to have some part in the memorial to the late Dr. Tucker.

On recommendation of the Department of Finance, a committee, consisting of the Chairman of the Departments of Missions and Church Extention, Finance and Field, was appointed to present to the parishes and missions of the Diocese, especially those who have not accepted the minimum responsibility, the needs of the Diocese.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

When I cannot have better things, I strive to make such as I have, better.

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



EXTRACTS FROM CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

CANON 43

OF THE DUE CELEBRATION OF SUNDAYS

All persons within this church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, by regular participation in the public worship of the Church, by hearing the Word of God read and taught, and by other acts of devotion and works of charity, using all godly and sober conversation.

CANON 44, SECTION 1

OF REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE LAITY

Section 1. A communicant in good standing removing from one parish or congregation to another shall be entitled to receive and shall procure from the Rector or Minister of the parish or congregation of his or her last residence, or if there be no Rector or Minster, from one of the Wardens, a certificate stating that he or she is duly registered or enrolled as communicant in the parish or congregation from which he or she desires to be transferred and the Rector or Minister or Warden of the parish or congregation to which such communicant may remove, shall enroll him or her as a communicant when such certificate is presented, or, on failure to procure such certificate through no fault of such communicant, upon other evidence of his or her being such a communicant sufficient in the judgment of the Rector or Minister. Notice of such enrollment in such parish or congregation to which such communicant shall have removed, shall be sent by the Rector or the Minister thereof to the Rector of the parish from which the communicant is removed.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS, CONVENTION OF 1940

FIRST DAY

Wilmington, N. C., January 24, 1940.

The Fifty-seventh Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of East Carolina met in St. James' Church, Wilmington, N. C., Wednesday, January 24, 1940.

At 10:00 A. M. the Convention met for organization and was opened with the Creed and prayers by the Bishop of the Diocese, Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D.

The Secretary called the roll and 30 clergymen, 18 parishes and four missions responded as follows:

A quorum being present, the Convention re-elected the Rev. W. R. Noe, Secretary.

The matter of the re-election of a President was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

In the absence of the Rector, who was sick in the

hospital, the Rev. Jack R. Rountree moved that the sessions be from 9:00 A. M. to 1:00 P. M.; from 2:30 to 5:00 P. M. and that the evening service be at 8:00 P. M., and this was adopted.

The regular Committees were appointed by the Bishop. The Bishop nominated Mr. George B. Elliott as Chancellor of the Diocese and the Rev. Stephen Gardner moved confirmation. Adopted.

The Rev. John Benners Gibble was appointed Chairman of a Committee on Dispatch of Business.

On motion, visiting clergy and candidates for Holy Orders were given seats in the Convention.

At 10:30 A. M., a service was held in St. James' Church and Mrs. Louis J. Poisson, President of the Woman's Auxiliary, made her annual address (See Appendix "C") and this was followed by the annual address of the Bishop of the Diocese. (See Appendix "A".)

A recess was then taken until 2:30 P. M.

At 2:30 P. M., the Convention re-assembled, the Bishop in the chair.

The Bishop appointed a Nominating Committee.

The Treasurer of the Diocese presented his report, which was referred to the Department of Finance. (See Appendix "B".)

The Committee on New Parishes made its report.

The report of the Board of Examining Chaplains was made by the Rev. E. W. Halleck as follows:

Vernon Earl Artis was examined by Rev. E. F. Moseley and Rev. Worth Wicker at Greenville, N. C., to be admitted as a candidate for Holy Orders, and he was recommended.

John Sterling Armfield was examined at Wilmington, N. C., by Rev. Alexander Miller and Rev. E. W. Halleck, for candidate as Deacon, and was ordained. He was examined for the Priesthood by Rev. E. F. Moseley and Rev. E. W. Halleck and was recommended and ordained.

The Rev. Stephen Gardner read the report of the Standing Committee as follows:

Report of the Standing Committee

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA FOR THE CONVENTION YEAR MAY 1939 - JANUARY 1940

The Fifty-sixth Annual Convention of the Diocese elected the following men as members of the Standing Committee for the ensuing year: The Rev. Stephen Gardner, the Rev. Sidney E. Matthews, the Rev. George Frank Hill, Mr. John G. Bragaw, and Mr. Guy C. Harding.

The first meeting was held in St. John's Church, Fayetteville, May 17th, for organization. The Rev. Stephen Gardner was elected President and Mr. John G. Bragaw, Secretary.

There were eight meetings held during the year.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Henry Hean Daniels to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Montana.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Edwin Jarvis Randall, S. T. D., to be Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Chicago.

Consent was given to the election of a Suffragan Bishop to the Diocese of Connecticut for the reason "extent of Diocesan work."

Consent was given to the House of Bishops to elect a Suffragan Bishop for the Missionary District of Southern Brazil.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Howard Rasmus Brinker to be Bishop of the Diocese of Nebraska.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Athalico Theodore Pithan, D. D., to be Bishop Suffragan of this Church in the Missionary District of Southern Brazil.

Mr. Edward Benjamin Ferguson, Jr., postulant, was recommended to the Bishop to be admitted Candidate for Holy Orders.

The Rev. John Sterling Armfield, deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests. The length of his diaconate was shortened to seven months.

Mr. H. Edmund Rogers made a report for the Committee on Constitution and Canons which was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS

Wilmington, N. C., Convention, January 24 - 25, 1940.

Your Committee on Canons reports as follows:

A. That since the Convention in May, 1939, at Fayette-ville, N. C., a complete research and examination has been made of the Journal of each Convention beginning with the Journal of the 1928 Convention, the last year of any printing of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, up to and including the Journal of the Convention of 1939, for the various reports of the Committee on Canons and the action taken by the various Conventions on said reports and after a complete check by the Secretary of the Diocese and your Chairman of this Committee and a final recheck by the said Secretary, a correct revision of the Constitution and the Canons of the Diocese of East Carolina appears in Exhibit "A" pages 1 to 6 inclusive as to the Constitution, and pages 7 to 20 inclusive as to the Canons.

1940

Report of Committee on Canons

Your Committee on Canons recommends the adoption of the following Resolution:

Resolved: That the Secretary of the Diocese have printed Exhibit "A" with changes made by the 1940 Convention as the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of East Carolina in pamphlet form in as many copies as the Bishop of the Diocese thinks sufficient for the needs of the Diocese.

That as amendments, additions, corrections and changes are made to the Constitution and Canons by the FINAL action of the succeeding Conventions, the said Secretary shall have printed on sheets such amendments, additions, corrections and changes, in a sufficient number and distribute the same to persons requesting them, to be attached in the proper places in the Constitution and Canons and thus eliminate heavy printing bills and also have an up-to-date set of the Constitution and Canons.

- B. Exhibit "B" page 1 is an amendment submitted to the Committee by Judge Rountree at the 1939 Convention, and your Committee after deliberate consideration of the same makes no recommendations as to its adoption but does submit it to the Convention for its action.
- 1. This amendment if adopted will eliminate the possibility of women serving on the vestry which is a recent expression of confidence by the Convention in the women.
- 2. It makes rotation of one-third of the vestry compulsory when it is now left to the discretion of the congregation of any parish by the present canon.
- 3. It makes compulsory on the part of each elected vestryman or woman the taking of a vow which is taken vicariously by each communicant at his or her baptism and actually and solemnly at his or her confirmation, and is the solid foundation of the communicant's daily life; it also has the effect of deterring some worthy persons from serving and thus deprives the congregation of its full right of suffrage in this respect.

Your Committee recommends the following amendments to the several Canons hereinafter mentioned:

Resolved: That Section 1 of Canon 14, in line three, after the word "day" the words "in the Advent Season" be changed to the word "thereafter", so as to read "or on such a day thereafter as the Parish may appoint".

And further, to accomplish which Judge Rountree's amendment would do without the compulsory feature or the taking of the declaration therein.

Resolved: That at the end of Section 1 of Canon 14, there be added the following: "Any such Parish may provide that no retiring member of its vestry shall be eligible for re-election until there shall have elapsed a period of one year."

Resolved: That Section 2 of Canon 9, be amended so that the word "third" in the last line of said Section shall read "last", for the reason that our Convention does not last three days.

Resolved: That Section 2 of Canon 16 be amended by striking out the words "vest in" in line 2 of said Section and substitute therefor the words "be conveyed to". Vesting of property takes place by force of the law of jurisdiction of the Parish, not by Ecclesiastical or Church Canons or Resolutions.

Resolved: That the word "April" at the end of line four be stricken out, and that there be substituted the words "December 31st". That the word "following" in line six be stricken out and there be substituted the words "prescribed by the Executive Council", so as to read, "according to the form prescribed by the Executive Council".

Resolved: And your Committee moves, That Canon 27, formerly Canon 29, on The Trial of Clergymen as found on pages 27-40 of the Canons of 1918, be printed in full in the Canons.

EXHIBIT "B"

CANON 14 Of The Vestry

Amend Section 1, of Canon 14 so as to make it read as follows: "Section 1. In every parish there shall be an annual election upon the Monday after the first Sunday in Advent, or on such day in the Advent season as the Parish may appoint, of a Vestry, consisting of not less than three and not more than twelve members, who shall be communicants, of lawful age, and in good standing, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.

"Vestrymen shall hereafter be elected in the following manner, viz.: One-third to serve for a period of one year, one-third to serve for a period of two years, one-third to serve for a period of three years; and thereafter one-third of the number of Vestrymen shall be elected for a period of three years. No retiring Vestryman shall be eligible for re-election until there shall have elapsed a period of one year.

"No person shall serve as Vestryman until he shall have subscribed to the following declaration:

"I believe that the Holy Scriptures contain all the doctrine necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ, our Lord; and I subscribe to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church."

Mr. George B. Elliott offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved: That Section 1 of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended by striking out the words "A President (who shall be a Presbyter of the Diocese)" so that the section shall read:

"The Convention shall annually elect a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Chancellor and a Registrar."

After report by the Finance Department on the Treasurer's report, the Rev. W. R. Noe was re-elected Treasurer of the Diocese.

It was reported to the Convention that the Rev. Mortimer Glover, Rector of the Parish, and the Rev. Alexander Miller, Rector of St. Paul's Parish, Wilmington, were absent on account of sickness and a committee consisting of the Rev. John R. Tolar and Mr. J. E. L. Wade was appointed to convey to them the regret of the Convention that they were unable to be present.

A Committee, consisting of the Rev. George F. Hill, the Rev. Worth Wicker, Rev. Stephen Gardner, Rev. J. Leon Malone and Rev. R. I. Johnson, was appointed to prepare suitable memorials on the deaths of the Rev. A. H. Marshall, Rev. Robert Brent Drane, D. D., Rev. W. O. Cone and Rev. J. E. Holder for the Journal.

The Secretary was directed to send messages to the Rev. J. B. Brown and Dr. H. W. Fisher who were prevented from being present at the Convention by sickness.

Messages were received from the Conventions of the Dioceses of Tennessee and Alabama.

A recess was taken until 8:00 P. M.

At 8:00 P. M., the Convention met in St. James' Church to celebrate the twenty-fifth Anniversary of the Consecration of Bishop Darst.

After a short service, addresses were made by Mr. George B. Elliott, Mrs. James G. Staton, Miss Isabel Tillinghast, Rev. R. I. Johnson, Bishop Albert S. Thomas, and the Rev. W. M Milton, D. D.

The offering was received for Diocesan Missions.

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Resolutions

SECOND DAY

Thursday, January 25, 1940,

At 7:30 A. M. the Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop.

At 9:30 A. M. the Convention re-assembled, the Bishop in the chair.

The Secretary was directed to send a telegram to Rev. John L. Jackson, Charlotte, N. C., congratulating him on his election as Bishop of Louisiana.

Rev. John R. Tolar made Report No. 2 of the Finance Department, which was adopted as follows:

Resolved: That the Treasurer of the Diocese be authorized to pay the expenses to the Convention of the Clergymen not yet connected with the Diocese who are now located and serving therein and of such clergymen as may have been prevented from being present at the opening of the Convention and also Candidates for Holy Orders and Postulants who are now serving in the Diocese.

Resolved Further: That the Treasurer be instructed to pay the Sexton of St. James' Church \$5.00 for services during the Convention.

The Committee on Unfinished Business made a report. The Rev. W. H. Wheeler, Superintendent of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution, made an address.

After a report from the Rev. E. F. Moseley and the nomination of the Rev. Stephen Gardner and Mr. John G. Bragaw from the floor for the Standing Committee, the following were elected:

For the Executive Council for three years: Rev. C. E. Williams, Rev. John R. Tolar, Mr. W. G. Gaither, Mr. J. A. Moore, Mrs. H. G. Walker.

Standing Committee: Rev. Worth Wicker, Rev. Jack R. Rountree, Rev. C. E. Williams, Mr. Albert Cowper, Mr. Guy C. Harding.

Trustees of St. Mary's School: Rev. John Benners Gibble,

to 1943; Mr. E. O. Rehm to 1943; Rev. Worth Wicker to 1941 to fill the unexpired term of the Rev. W. M. Latta.

Trustees of the Diocese: The Bishop, Mr. J. V. Grainger, Mr. F. T. Darden.

Mr. Junius D. Grimes offered the following resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Canons:

Resolved: That the Committee on Canons be requested to prepare a Canon providing that in election of Delegates to General Convention, the four persons receiving the highest votes be declared elected as delegates and the four persons receiving the next highest votes be declared elected as alternates.

Major McCullough B. Wilson made a report for the Committee on the Diocesan Survey. He recommended that the Committee be continued and given power after consultation with the Bishop, to add to its membership, and that a report be made to the Convention in 1941. Adopted.

Rev. Jack R. Rountree made a report for the Committee on the State of the Church as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH TO THE 57TH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA, JANUARY 24TH, 1940, AT WILMINGTON, N. C.

Your committee feels inclined to evaluate the State of the Church, this year, not upon facts that lie upon the surface and can be measured in terms of statistics and mathematics, but upon those underlying and spiritual realities that lie deep down under the surface of the organism and bespeak a virility and life that give meaning and value to personality, be it individual or corporate.

Neither figures indicating physicial and numerical growth or decline, nor observations as to increase or decrease of financial support are a true index of Church vitality in such times as these. For a rapidly expanding paganization and secularization of modern living, and increasing economic uncertainty, together with increasing political tensions and international antagonisms have resulted in a partial eclipse of spiritual realities, which are world-wide and necessarily affect the life and thought of the peoples in every home and hamlet throughout the whole world.

So it seems unreasonable that any estimation of the State of the Church—even in our own Diocese of East Carolina—should be based upon statistical reports, but upon certain intangibles whose existence is indicated by a general tendency of our people to inquire into causes and seek to discover a solution of religious problems, not in terms of increasing activities and multiplication of programs, but in discovering the will of God, His purpose for man and endeavoring to enter into more intimate relations of devotion and loyalty to Him.

This is a time of stress, when the chaff is being winnowed from the wheat, and it may well be that untold good may result from the winnowing. Our thought is not so much as to the numerical growth of the Diocese and the state of its finances, as to what indication is there that the Church is awakening to a sense of its responsibility to God and to do its part in establishing the Kingdom of God in that part of the world where the duty of the Diocese, as a part of the Church of our Lord Jesus Christ, lies.

We are further of the conviction that the multiplication of programs tends to divert activity from our main purpose to help God reconcile the world unto Himself through faith in Jesus Christ His Son, and by the power of the Holy Spirit. It is in the integration of its life about the personality of that Great Lover of Mankind, and the correlation of its programs and activities about working together with Him that our splendid spiritual resources are to become effective.

With due apologies to those statistically minded folk who judge growth by increasing confirmations and a balanced budget, we confidently believe that the Church has been undergoing a real spiritual awakening, during the past few years, and that the evangelistic spirit and missionary fervor have been growing and deepening. Among an increasing number of our clergy and laity there is a searching of heart and turning to God with the belief that "if ye seek me ye shall find me, when ye seek for me with all your heart."

Missions held throughout the Diocese during the past few years have aroused a turning towards God that is most truly indicative of religious growth. Our people are giving more real thought to God and His Church. These things are not measurable in statistics but in an improving quality of spiritual life and a deepening sense of responsibility. And upon those things depend the eventual increase in numerical growth and financial support.

Your committee notes, perhaps, some slight increase in numerical strength—nor does it look with anxiety upon reports

January

indicating in some places a seeming decrease. What has happened in many of our churches during the past year has been a re-examination of the membership rolls, with a determination to have them represent the actual membership of the local congregation, and not an imperfect one. One church recently made a full investigation of its membership roll and found that it had been reporting the names of many long since deceased, some who had placed their membership in other fields without so reporting, and some, who "just didn't care".

So we would advise that figures of decrease should be considered with caution, before one speaks pessimistically.

We have noted disparaging remarks in other reports of former committees as to the condition of our rural Sunday Schools. We doubt that facts are as bad as some would suggest. It is true that economic conditions have seriously affected conditions in our rural areas and many have been forced from the farms to the cities and larger towns. But many of our rural schools are doing a fine piece of work.

We notice the charge that in the past there has been lack of leadership and teachers in the rural Sunday Schools. But we have heard similar remarks from many city and town churches, from Carolina to California. Yet we have observed that rural Sunday Schools are keeping on and doing the best under the circumstances.

With the plea from the Department of Education for an educational field worker, we are heartily in accord provided that field worker be one who is thoroughly familiar with and trained in the problems of the small country and rural field, and devote most of the time to those areas in helping inefficient schools to work out a program of curricula, etc., that will increase their efficiency and make them of greater value in religious educational activities.

We are fully convinced that the program of the Department of Evangelism which was submitted to and adopted by the Clergy Conferences and Convocations, should be carefully carried out by all of the churches in the Diocese. This program will increase the spiritual life of the Church, with a resultant increase of responsibility to maintain and support the work of the Diocese.

We feel that the work of the Departments of the Executive Council should be better correlated. It is our conviction that every department should submit its program to the Executive Council and that it should be carefully considered by the entire Council on its individual merits and upon its relation to the programs of other departments. This would make it possible

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to prevent conflicts and irresponsible action. After due consideration by the Council, the program should—if and as amended—be adopted by the Executive Council as the program of the Diocese and the department then charged with the responsibility to promote and carry it out.

No department should be permitted—not even the Promotional Department—to present a program until it has been fully considered and accepted by the Executive Council. For this reason we feel that the Convention should insist that the Excutive Council meet more regularly and less hurriedly and give thought and deliberation to the work of the Diocese. Its work is of utmost importance to the Diocese, and it should feel a responsibility to perform its duty, and the departments should consider their obligations to have their plans and programs subjected to the criticism and review of the Council before they are published and promoted.

We are of the conviction that the new Church Pension Fund Committee should make a full and complete status of the condition of the Pension Fund and that an effort should be made to bring the Pension Fund payments up to date.

A source of considerable confusion to the leadership of the churches is in large measure due to lack of certain information. The acts of and reports to the Convention should be available to the Church leadership within a reasonable time after the close of the Convention. We believe that it is a false economy that causes delay in publication of the Convention Journal. We therefore believe that the Convention should order the publication of the Journal within ninety days after the adjournment.

Another matter of concern is the lack of information as to just what the Canons of the Diocese are. Few of us know whether or not we are acting within the Canons. We therefore suggest that the Canons of the Diocese should be ordered printed within ninety days after the adjournment of the Convention.

Your committee is of further conviction that considerable aid could be rendered the churches of the Diocese if there were regular visitation by the executive office to consider the condition of the various churches, their problems, and advice and assistance rendered in the solution of those problems. We are of the conviction that the contract between the Diocese and the missionary clergy is such that it is incumbent upon the Diocesan office to assist the Missionary Clergy in securing the fulfillment of its obligations by local congregations. Few clergy are financial wizards, nor should they be. Their first duty is that of a Holy Priesthood and Prophetic Ministry that should not be overly encumbered with mere financial duties. Only

through the help of the Diocesan office can the Clergy receive that fair treatment to which as Clergy they are entitled.

From all over the Diocese has come the plea, "Sirs, we would see Jesus". "We want to know God". It seems to us that that is the first duty of the Clergy and preacher; to help men and women see and know God. Therefore we suggest that the Clergy give more attention to the study of the Word of God, with a view to finding it part and parcel of their lives, so that through them the light might shine. Despite modern trends in secularizing thought, and economic trends and social upheavals, the great need of our people is still, "Jesus Christ and him crucified". Let us not be "ashamed of the gospel for it is still the power of God unto salvation".

May we close our report with the plea that we make a strong determination, this year, to enthrone God as King of kings and Lord of lords, and that we, as Christians, be about our Father's business.

The recommendations were adopted.

Mr. George B. Elliott of the Committee on Canons, offered an amendment to Canon 10, which was adopted, as follows:

Amend Canon 10 by adding after the word "mentioned" in line 9 thereof, the following sentence:

"Such election may, if the Convention so decides by a majority vote, be made upon a majority of the votes cast, or upon a plurality, whereby the four persons receiving the four highest number of votes shall be elected as deputies, and the four next highest shall be elected as alternates" so that the Canon shall read:

At each Annual Convention there may, and at each Annual Convention immediately preceding the triennial session of the General Convention there shall be elected four Clerical and four Lay Deputies to the said General Convention, who shall be, in accordance with Article 1 of the Constitution of the General Convention "Communicants in this Church and residents in the Diocese." There may also be elected four Alternate Clerical and four Alternate Lay Deputies, subject to the same provisions as the original Deputies above mentioned. Such election may, if the Convention so decides by a majority vote, be made upon a majority of the votes cast, or upon a plurality whereby the four persons receiving the four highest number

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of votes shall be elected as deputies, and the four next highest shall be elected as alternates. The said deputation in the order of their election as indicated by the number of votes cast for each, and in case of the same number of votes having been cast for two or more in either order, precedence shall be given to the Clerical alternates in the order of official and to the Lay alternates in the order of personal seniority; and the Secretary shall insert the names of the alternates in this order upon the Journal.

Deputies elect to the General Convention, finding themselves unable to attend, shall four weeks at least before the time of meeting, give notice to the Diocesan Secretary, who shall at once notify the proper alternate.

The Rev. W. R. Noe, Secretary, presented the report of the Church Pension Fund Committee.

After discussion of the work done by the Bishop's Memorial Anniversary Fund Committee, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved: That the Department of Finance be and same is hereby directed to consolidate the indebtedness of the Diocese existing on January 1, 1939, with the unpaid indebtedness incurred during the year 1939; and apportion the aggregate amount thereof among the different parishes and missions on the basis of their respective number of communicants and that each said parish and mission be requested to assume direct responsibility for the amounts so determined to be their proper share thereof and that each parish and mission be given credit for the amounts paid by them respectively on their said shares as requested in the resolutions passed by the conferences at Washington and White Lake and the Co-ordination Committee appointed by the Bishop.

The Rev. R. I. Johnson made the report of the Good Shepherd Hospital in New Bern as follows:

REPORT OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD HOSPITAL TO THE ANNUAL CONVENTION

For a year and a half the Good Shepherd Hospital has been carrying on the mission for which it was created: to bring the ministry of healing in larger measure to a portion of the 300,000 Negroes in this Diocese, in the name of our Lord and His Church. To those of us who have been identified with the Good Shepherd, there has been a wealth of satisfaction that the In-

stitution has gotten under way so well and has met in such a splendid way such a large measure of the need for this kind of service to humanity. On every hand there is praise to the Church for its enterprise and generosity in making the hospital possible. The colored people show in many ways their appreciation of the hospital and are beginning to show some improvement in paying for the treatments received. During several months in the latter part of 1939 receipts were sufficient to meet current expenses. During 1939, we gave 3,500 free days of care. If we were able to do this without becoming heavily involved in debt it was because many small donations from friends here at home and other parts of the country have come in to help us stem the tide. Among these friends who have stood by us are branches of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of East Carolina, who not only furnished the Emergency Ward at the Good Shepherd, but donated last week the receipts of their summer work for the Good Shepherd. Besides this we have received linens and books that have been timely and helpful. It should prove of interest just here that there passed through the Emergency Ward furnished by the Woman's Auxiliary of East Carolina, during the first year of operation, more than 4,000 clinical and emergency patients, treated there by the County Health Department. In addition 80 hospital emergency cases passed through there also, that is, people shot and cut and otherwise battered up, brought in by police and passersby.

The following is a report of our first year's work with patients that came to us from Craven, Carteret, Beaufort, Pamlico, Jones, Onslow, Hyde, Pitt and Lenoir counties:

White and colored doctors work side by side in a by-racial

set-up. Although there are several operations every week, and on some days as many as four, we have not lost a major operation since February. This is an unusual record.

Elizabeth is a baby who was brought in with a condition suggesting deliberate starving. She had a dehydrated body and was sub-human in appearance. She was kept at the hospital for months, completely returned to normal health, and was baptized at St. Cyprian's last Spring. We always have some such child at the hospital. "Punkie" was cured of spinal meningitis and pneumonia. When she returned home, no one could fix her food or clothing to suit her.

Rural mothers, usually delivered by midwives, are learning to use the hospital maternity ward.

Our professional staff remains the same although Dr. Kafer has been out for several months as a result of an automobile accident, and Dr. Fisher has been confined since before Thanksgiving. Drs. Duffie, Wadsworth, Ashford, Mumford, Mann and Martin have done all the work in the meantime. As an indication of the stabilization of personnel, all nurses employed at our last report are still on the staff under the leadership of Miss Rebecca Hennie, who succeeded Miss Anderson as superintendent in 1939. A letter signed by all our doctors recently, and sent to Dr. Rankin and Bishop Darst expressed their complete satisfaction with the operation of the hospital and the relations with subordinate personnel. I must add a word from Dr. Duffy, who said to me in the Post Office last Saturday morning: "The Good Shepherd Hospital is doing a fine piece of work. We have saved the lives of a good many who otherwise would have died but for the Good Shepherd." Dr. McGeachy told the County Commissioners recently, "The Good Shepherd Hospital is beautifully operated and deserves all the encouragement that can be given it."

An outstanding service this year was the tuberculosis clinic in which the lungs of several hundred public school children were X-rayed.

The writer still rejoices in the fine helpfulness of Mr. Noe, whose wisdom and foresight are invaluable, and whose direction of the policy and official relations of the hospital has been a great source of strength. I thank Mr. Noe and also Mr. Williams, whose chairmanship of our Administrative Board has assured thorough understanding and harmony and clarity of planning and operations.

Behind us all has been the sympathetic encouragement of our Bishop whose prayers and good wishes have made us feel that we just had to get on somehow. I invite and invoke your aid in helping to make firm and durable the foundations of this Christian institution which in the name of our Lord and this Church seeks to bring health to the thousands who in so many ways serve our people in homes, and fields and shops; for they constitute a challenge at our very doors let our attitude be what it may on the challenge of fields abroad. These are Lazarus at the door with sore and grievous wounds; and it is true, that crumbs that fall from rich men's tables will heal them, body, soul and spirit. Crumbs, the multiplied small gifts of "Friends of the Good-Shepherd Hospital," can possibly provide the needed deficiency that will mean success. I invoke your continued interest and friendship.

The report of the Committee on Insurance was presented by the Rev. John Benners Gibble as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

The Committee on Insurance respectfully submit their report for the year as follows:

During the year the Rectory of St. Andrew's Church, Wrightsville, requested us to cover with insurance for \$2,000.00 and they agreed to pay the premium on this addition.

This brought the amount of insurance carried under the Schedule policy to \$77,685.00, which is an increase of \$2,000.00 over last year.

As reported last year we had all property covered and the usurance policy inspected as to values. We have to report that in almost every instance the values are in line with the amount of insurance carried, though there should be some increases on some of the property.

Your committee has sent bills and written to a number of the parishes and missions in order to collect the premium on the insurance on their property. They ignore all communications and if any of them are here present we would ask that they at least acknowledge our communications.

We do, however, desire to express our deep appreciation for all who have given us such splendid co-operation and we ask for a continuance of the same.

It has been a privilege and pleasure for the committee to serve you. We are at your service now and if called on in the future we will give you the best that we have.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS



BISHOP'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of East Carolina.

"Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ."

For twenty-five years it has been my blessed privilege to extend that greeting to you as we have met, in love and fellowship, to take council together concerning the King's business, and it is from an humble and grateful heart that I give you that greeting today as we enter upon our second quarter century as fellow laborers with Him Whose loving presence has made of our Diocese a family of God.

During all of our years together, it has been seldom that the ranks of our Clergy have been broken by death, but today it becomes my sad duty to report to you that five of our number have left our earthly company during the past year. May we stand as I read their names.

"Remember Thy servants, O Lord, according to the favor which Thou bearest unto Thy people, and grant that, increasing in knowledge and love of Thee, they may go from strength to strength in the life of perfect service, in Thy Heavenly Kingdom; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost ever, one God, world without end, Amen."

One is tempted at such a time as this to dwell on the past, to recount accomplishments, to give statistical information, showing growth in numbers and in financial responsibility, but it is not my intention to yield to that temptation today.

We are grateful that as a Diocese we have shown substantial growth and that many of our people have not been unmindful of their responsibility as stewards of God's bounty, and we could well spend a pleasant hour reviewing the high lights of the past twenty-five years.

Personally, such an exercise would make me very happy, for every advance in our diocesan life, every little triumph over difficulties, every foot of new ground won for the King, is recorded on the tablet of my heart and included in my grateful prayers.

But, the whole purpose of our coming together would be defeated—the whole challenging call of our time would go unheeded, if I had no more stirring message than the story of what we have tried to do during the past quarter of a century.

Our only excuse for looking into the past today is that we may be enabled to take stock of our resources, face with honesty and courage our failures, examine our weaknesses, and by God's grace, go forth to build a better Diocese and a fairer world. Because this is true; because you and I are not satisfied that we have given our best as individuals, and as a Diocese, I desire to point out some of the ways in which we may strengthen the Kingdom of God in East Carolina, some of the ways in which a reconsecrated and rededicated Clergy and people may cooperate with God in carrying out His plans.

Looking After Our Own

When I came to East Carolina in 1915, we had five thousand three hundred and ninety Communicants. Since that time, I have Confirmed eight thousand, nine hundred people, and yet today we have but seven thousand, seven hundred and seventy-five Communicants—a loss of six thousand, five hundred Communicants in twenty-five years. Where have they gone? More than two thousand have died. More than one thousand have left the Diocese. More than two thousand have drifted away from the Church for two reasons.

- 1. Because they were presented for Confirmation without adequate preparation as to the meaning and purpose and glory of the Church, or,
- 2. Because they were not tenderly received, lovingly guarded and given a place and part in the family life of the Church after Confirmation.

We must look out for all of God's children, my brethren of the Clergy and the Laity, but especially those who belong to the "household of faith."

It is easy to drop from our list of Communicants a member who has not Communed for three years. It is fatally easy for a congregation to accept the absence of a former worshiper, but I believe God will want to know why that person turned away from the Altar. God will want to know why the family did not seem to care when a member was lost in the night.

I lay this matter upon the hearts and consciences of our Clergy and people with the earnest hope that in every parish and mission steps will be taken to stop this dreadful waste and to bring back into the fold of Christ those who by their own indifference or our neglect have wandered away.

This thought leads naturally to the conviction that we must have a more compelling

Sense of Stewardship

We have grown to associate stewardship with money, but after all that is such a small part of this tremendous business and it can never be a substitute for stewardship of life. Of course every Christian must realize that he should play fair with God in the distribution of his ma-

terial goods. Not how much I should give to the work of extending His Kingdom, but how much can I keep for myself is the ideal toward which we should strive. God has not entrusted all of us with money, but to all of us He has given other and more precious gifts and He has given them to be used, not for self only, but in order that we may be sharers with Him in the redemption of His world.

Some of us budget our money, giving what we consider a fair share to God and His Church, but I wonder how many of us budget our time, giving a fair and honest part to the service and worship of the King. Are we playing fair with God, or are we content to give Him a few minutes of purely selfish worship at the end of a weary day? Are we willing that God should give to us and ours the scant attention that we give to Him? Does He, the giver of all life, the gracious dispenser of our days and hours, have for His own blessed use as much of our time as we devote to the morning paper or our favorite radio program? I leave this answer to the honesty of our hearts, but I know that we can never go forward to glorious triumphs as individuals, as parishes, as a diocese, until we are ready and willing to give God His rightful share of our time, until we are willing to be used in unselfish service in the blessed work of setting up His Kingdom in the hearts of children, in the poor, empty lives of sinning, suffering men and women in the disordered and confused world of which we are members.

Our greatest need as we face the new day is for a

Renewal of Spiritual Forces.

We will not go out after our lost brothers until we go in the conscious presence and compelling power of Jesus. We will not become faithful stewards of money and time and talents until the love of Christ constrains us. We will not give ourselves to others until, in joyful surrender, we give ourselves to God.

We must, my beloved people, come back to Him, not because of the storm that darkens the world, not to save our own little lives from the terrors of the storm, but as sons and daughters of the Eternal Father, we must go in order to share with Him in making a new world.

It is a great task—a hard, glorious task—the only task worthy of men and women who dare to say "Our Father, Who art in Heaven, hallowed be Thy name, Thy Kingdom come on earth."

It is not a task for spiritual weaklings, petulant, peevish little men and women who seethe in their resentments, jealousies and criticisms, having no conception of the Church and its Mission beyond the local group of which they are the center; but it is a task for men and women, however humble, however rich or poor in this world's goods, who are willing to let God have his way in their lives.

Have we the power as individuals and as a Diocese to share with God in the tremendous task that faces His Church today?

May we answer that question with our dedicated lives as we draw near with faith to receive the precious gift of His matchless love.

May this day be in deed and in truth a day of Dedication. May we as Bishop, Clergy and people lay our lives upon the sacrificial Altar of our God, pleading with the Holy Spirit to burn away our selfishness and our sins, recreating in us that divine power that will enable us to overcome the world.

The Altar, however, is not to be our resting place, but our starting point—not the place of withdrawal, but the high mount of renewal. From the Mount of Transfiguration, Jesus went down to meet and heal the suffering and sin in the valley. From the upper room of His high and holy sacramental meal, Jesus went to the sacrament of the cross.

From the Altar today, we will go to the valley of our ordinary lives—to the problems of our parishes and communities—to the cruelty and hate and greed of our poor, broken, war-crazed world.

But we will go as men and women who have looked into the face of God and heard his voice.

We will go, not in bewilderment and fear and doubt, but as loyal soldiers and servants of the Master of all life—"strong in the strength that God supplies through His eternal Son."

May God bless and guide us, my brethren, as we go out to build the Kingdom of God in the lives of men, in our parishes, in the neglected corners of our Diocese, and in the broken heart of the world.

For twenty-five years we have walked together as friends through storms and difficulty, through pleasant days and dark—we have gone forward conscious that One walked with us through light and shadow.

Dear Christ, grant that we may march on together with Thee till victory crowns our strivings and peace comes to our hearts and to our world.

As previously reported, the International Match Company is in bankruptcy, and the bonds of this Company held by the Diocese are being carried in the assets at the par value of \$2,500.00, and no attempt was made

by us to place a realizable value on same. During the year under review a liquidation dividend in the amount of \$100.00 was received on these bonds and was shown as a receipt under Diocesan support.

With reference to the comments in our previous report regarding the note from St. Paul's Church of Wilmington in the amount of \$404.40, we are advised that the Finance Department authorized the return of this note to the Church.

In our opinion, based upon such examination and subject to the foregoing comments, the accompanying statement correctly sets forth the financial condition of the Diocese at December 31, 1939, also for the receipts and disbursements for the year ended that date.

APPENDIX "C"

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA

Rt. Rev. Father in God, Members of the Diocesan Convention, and, Members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

At such a time as this when we are called upon to celebrate the twenty-fifth Anniversary of the Consecration of our beloved Bishop, I feel, knowing and loving him as we do, that he will realize that cherished place which he possesses in our hearts. As he leads us in the Forward march of the Church today may we rededicate the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese as a body of loyal women ever ready to follow wheresoever he may lead us.

In presenting a resume of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary over the last eight months we cannot refrain from a feeling of joy in what has been accomplished. Undoubtedly there has been a growth of spiritual consciousness evidenced. Our women are catching the vision. They are approaching the point where they are glad of the privilege to answer the call of Christ Crucified. "I, if I be lifted up, will bring all men unto me."

Within our Diocese during the last few months we have been honored by an extended visit of one of those beautiful characters, Miss Sallie Dean, of Richmond, Va. She most unselfishly has conducted institutes of one week each in seven of our cities. Her stay with us has been a benediction and the love which she has so tenderly implanted is gradually spreading through the Diocese. Already I have seen three instances where groups of at least 50 women each have literally right about faced and

I firmly believe that these are only a beginning of a great awakening.

Last year, I asked that our parishes make an effort to utilize the knowledge and interest of their women in forming a unified parish educational program. I am indeed happy to report that this has been done by one of our parishes to my certain knowledge, and has been proven not only practical but most beneficial. Let us urge that more of our parishes try this method.

The most valuable contribution which the Woman's Auxiliary can make to the Church in this distressed world of ours is to make of us loyal members of the unified Church, the body of Christ, through constant study of the Word of Christ directing our thoughts. This Christian spirit must enter into us, all of us, in all of our activities, business and social. Truly this is a task—but I feel that our educational department is doing a beautiful piece of work in bringing this about. Let us strive to create a consciousness of a world wide fellowship.

During the past year the Christian Social Relations Department has visited the sick and shut-ins, county homes and jails ministering to human needs. This department cooperates both with local social agencies and other denominational organizations. Through this work the women have strengthened their own spiritual lives.

The Field Department reports a growing interest in the work of this department throughout the Diocese. There is much indication that the work is going forward as 35 parishes have field chairmen. In co-operation with the leadership of the National Council, Every Member Canvass material was mailed each of the 71 Auxiliaries. The November issue of the Spirit of Missions was included in this material. A Diocesan Scholarship Contest is now underway. The subject of the Essay is "Evangelism First—why?" and we hope it will create great interest in this subject.

Through the Department of Publicity many Church

news items have been sent to local and state papers and to The Mission Herald. In February a copy of the resolution adopted by the National Executive Board regarding the Jews in Germany was sent to all daily and weekly papers in the Diocese and a copy to each Rector with a request that he read the resolutions at a Sunday morning service. A campaign was conducted in the Fall to obtain subscriptions to the Spirit of Missions with splendid results in a number of parishes.

One of the co-operating agencies of the Woman's Auxiliary is the Church Periodical Club. Leaflets, Bibles, prayer books, hymnals, games, secular books and scrap books have been distributed. One hundred ninety birthday cards were sent to our East Carolina Missionaries. Fifty-six Auxiliary members send 75 magazines regularly each month to isolated people. Through this department the following institutions have been aided: C. C. Camps, County Homes, Delgado Mission, Galilee Mission, St. Phillip's Church, Salvation Army, Red Cross Sanitarium, Stockade, Good Shepherd Hospital, Katherine Kennedy Home, Community Hospital and Colored Churches.

The Supply Work is a very important part of the Woman's Auxiliary. The women of East Carolina through this department have sent clothing amounting to \$361 through its regular allotments from headquarters and through boxes of clothing which were voluntarily sent has contributed \$495. Boxes were sent to the Thompson Orphanage amounting to \$1,187.61. In all, the women of this diocese through this department have contributed \$2,048.75.

The past year marked the 50th Anniversary of the United Thank Offering of the Women of the Church. In this Diocese the offering in 1939 has increased 5½ per cent over 1938. The interest manifested and the fact that many more women are sharing in this gift from thankful hearts makes us believe that our women

are realizing the significance of this Holy offering of prayers and gifts and joyful service.

And so in re-capitulating we find that the financial contributions of the women of this Diocese in the five fields of service are:

We, the women of the Diocese, ask of the Rectors and Laymen, that an effort be made whereby the Woman's Auxiliary not be called upon to do the work which is the privilege of the congregation to perform. That in those parishes where this practice exists that such responsibilities be lifted from the Woman's Auxiliary and placed upon the proper group. The women of the Church have a two-fold obligation—that which they owe as members of the parish and that which they owe as members of an organized group within the parish. Let us not endanger the efficiency of the latter by the possibility of effort to merge those separate obligations. Carpets for the floor of the Church, sexton's salary, coal and laundry bills and such expenses are expenses of the parish and should be paid by the parish and not by the Woman's Auxiliary. By this I mean that the routine expenses of the parish should be paid by the pledges of the parish members. Perhaps in instances where the funds will not meet the expense, it might be wise to concentrate your efforts on a more thorough Every Member Canvass. All of these expenses are necessary and must be met but let us not be quite so willing to shift them on the ever willing shoulders of our women. Leave them free to do those things which the womanhood of our Church has been commissioned to do in the five fields of service. This desire comes not only as a request from the Woman's Auxiliary, but is the earnest plea of our Bishop who has assured us that he stands firmly behind us on this matter.

May the ever present Father of us all continue to find us always ready to do his bidding in the Forward March of the Church.

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

EXTRACTS FROM CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

CANON 43


OF THE DUE CELEBRATION OF SUNDAYS

All persons within this church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, by regular participation in the public worship of the Church, by hearing the Word of God read and taught, and by other acts of devotion and works of charity, using all godly and sober conversation.

CANON 44, SECTION 1

OF REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE LAITY

Section 1. A communicant in good standing removing from one parish or congregation to another shall be entitled to receive and shall procure from the Rector or Minister of the parish or congregation of his or her last residence, or if there be no Rector or Minster, from one of the Wardens, a certificate stating that he or she is duly registered or enrolled as communicant in the parish or congregation from which he or she desires to be transferred and the Rector or Minister or Warden of the parish or congregation to which such communicant may remove, shall enroll him or her as a communicant when such certificate is presented, or, on failure to procure such certificate through no fault of such communicant, upon other evidence of his or her being such a communicant sufficient in the judgment of the Rector or Minister. Notice of such enrollment in such parish or congregation to which such communicant shall have removed, shall be sent by the Rector or the Minister thereof to the Rector of the parish from which the communicant is removed.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS, CONVENTION OF 1941

FIRST DAY

Elizabeth City, N. C., May 14, 1941.

The Fifty-eighth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of East Carolina met in Christ Church, Elizabeth City, N. C., Wednesday, May 14, 1941.

At 7:30 A. M. the Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by Rev. Stephen Gardner, Rev. W. R. Noe and Rev. George F. Hill.

At 10:00 A. M. the Convention met for organization and was opened with the creed and prayers by the Bishop of the Diocese, Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D.

The Secretary called the roll and 32 clergymen and 16 parishes and 8 missions responded as follows:

A quorum being present, the Convention re-elected the Rev. W. R. Noe, Secretary.

The Rev. George F. Hill moved that the sessions be from 10:00 A. M. to 1:00 P. M.; from 2:30 P. M. to 5:00 P. M. and that evening service be at eight o'clock. This was adopted.

The regular committees were appointed by the Bishop. The Bishop nominated Mr. George B. Elliott as Chancellor of the Diocese and Mr. Junius D. Grimes moved confirmation.

Adopted.

On motion, visiting clergy and Candidates for Holy Orders were given seats in the Convention.

The Bishop read the statistical part of his address. (See Appendix "A").

The Treasurer of the Diocese presented his report, which was referred to the Department of Finance. (See Appendix "B").

The Bishop appointed a nominating committee as follows: Rev. J. Leon Malone, Rev. S. N. Griffith, Mr. R. S. Plummer.

The Rev. Charles E. Williams read the report of the Standing Committee as follows:

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA FOR THE CONVENTION YEAR 1940-1941

The Fifty-seventh Annual Convention of the Diocese, held in St. James' Church, Wilmington, January 25th, 1940, elected the following to be members of the Standing Committee for the ensuing year:

The Rev. Jack R. Rountree, The Rev. Worth Wicker, The Rev. Charles E. Williams, Mr. Guy C. Harding, Mr. Albert W. Cowper.

The first meeting was held January 25th, 1940 in St. James' parish house, Wilmington, for the purpose of organization.

On the nomination of Mr. Guy C. Harding the Rev. Worth Wicker was elected President.

On the nomination of the Rev. Charles E. Williams Mr. Albert W. Cowper was elected Secretary.

Nine meetings of your Standing Committee were held during the year.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. John Long Jackson to be Bishop of Louisiana.

Charles Merchant Johnson, Candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop to be ordered Deacon.

Vernon Earl Artis, Candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop to be ordered Deacon.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Walter Henry Gray, B. D., to be Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Connecticut.

Edward Benjamin Ferguson, Candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop to be ordered Deacon.

William Bell Daniels, postulant, was recommended to the Bishop to be admitted a Candidate for Holy Orders.

On Septmber 25th, the Rev. Worth Wicker, President of the Standing Committee resigned to enter Federal military service. On the nomination of Mr. Guy C. Harding the Rev. Charles E. Williams was elected Vice-President of the Standing Committee.

Harvey Glazier, postulant, was recommended to the Bishop to be admitted a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Consent was given to the election of the Rev. Wallace Edmonds Conkling to be Bishop of Chicago.

The Rev. Charles Merchant Johnson, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests.

The attendance of all members at the meetings was excellent. Respectfully submitted,

The report of the Committee on the State of the Church was read by Rev. John R. Tolar, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH TO 1941 CONVENTION

Your committee has received from the Executive Secretary the following statistics reflecting in this field the state of the Church.

The Parishes and Missions paid for Diocesan, General Church purposes \$30,079.94, an increase over the previous year, and more than had been paid for any year in some time.

At the beginning of 1940 the amount of the Diocesan debt was \$22,315.00. By the time of the Convention, this had been reduced by payments to \$19,195.00. During the year we have received from Parishes and Missions, on the debt, enough to reduce our indebtedness to \$12,516.80.

In 1940, for the first time in several years, we paid our full quota of \$7,000.00 to the General Church, and we gave within a few dollars of the \$3,000.00 asked of us by the Thompson Orphanage.

A building for the use of the workers at Calabash was given by a Baptist layman and a lot has been given in Jacksonville for a Church and other buildings.

There is very little change in our Church Schools, but the Young Peoples Service League and other organizations for young people have shown real growth.

The insurance on Church buildings remains about the same. With few exceptions all the property is protected by insurance. The Insurance Committee has urged the few places that are not covered to take out policies, but the members say their buildings are in rural areas where there is not much danger of fire.

All of the above gives us ground for courage and hope, for which we give thanks to Almighty God.

Yet we are gratified and encouraged by greater and more important things than these! For increased evidence of growth in what your Committee of last year so well described as "those underlying and spiritual realities that lie deep down under the surface." The things which indicate the real state of the soul of the Church, of her consciousness of her mission to be the mediator of the Gospel. There are ample indications, your Committee thinks, of a more widespread realization of this, the real mission of the Church, than has been evidenced in many years, as well as a greater willingness among a greater number of our laity to accept personal, individual responsibility for the accomplishment of that mission.

Outward evidence of these things were the attendance, enthusiasm, earnestness, the deep spiritual note which characterized the meetings of the laymen held in both Convocations.

The-inauguration of the Layman's Thank Offering is another evidence of these things. So also the widespread activity which made possible so great a reduction in the Diocesan debt. An activity which an enthusiastic Committee of laymen is still continuing with promise of final success.

No less an indication is the improved financial picture noted at the beginning of this report, for only where one's heart is will we give of our treasures.

No corporate life can rise higher than its leadership. Therefore, one of the most encouraging signs of these Spiritual realities to which we have alluded has been the monthly meetings of a group of the clergy, for prayer, fellowship and study of the

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things pertaining to God, which culminated in the Retreat led by Father Hughson last fall. The effect of these meetings, the Retreat, on those attending them cannot be over-exaggerated. Your Committee urges not only that these meetings be continued, with strong effort made to increase the attendance, but urges also that a yearly retreat be made a feature of the permanent program of the Diocese.

Your Committee also urges the importance of making more effective use of the meetings of the Convocations as means for the advancement of the life work of the Diocese. They should be representative gatherings of the clergy, laity with programs of a sort that would assure attendance on them.

The recommendation of your Committee of last year that the work of the several Departments of the Executive Council should be better correlated has been carried out in the manner suggested with beneficial results.

We believe also that the Committee's suggestions as to regular visitations by the Executive office is being followed as far as is practicable under present conditions. The Office is always ready to respond to special appeals for guidance.

The National Defense program has called many of the young men of our Church into training in the various camps, many of which are located in this Diocese.

Many of the Churches are putting on campaigns for funds to care for their young men in the army. We feel that it is important for this Diocese to cooperate with the National Council in providing clergy to care for our young men, since it is manifestly impossible for the local congregations to do this work adequately.

Therefore, we recommend that a special committee be appointed to cooperate with the National Council in raising funds to provide civilian chaplains to care for the Churchmen now in the camps and to assist the local Church in providing for their spiritual welfare.

The success or failure of the Presiding Bishop's Ten Year Program will depend entirely on the cooperation of the individual Parish or Mission. We feel that it is unnecessary to emphasize the importance of this cooperation as we feel sure that the clergy already realize this, and will make it an important part of their preaching and their parochial programs.

Last, but by no means least, your Committee notes with sympathy and great anxiety the present state of our beloved Bishop's health, which has compelled him for a time to take a too long deferred rest. We urge that he make this rest an adequate one.

No one of us can quite realize his strain of the last critical years, years when but for his leadership many of us might have faltered. That we are now rejoicing in the signs of new and better things is largely the result of his having been able to inspire us with his own high faith.

Our part now is to hold up his hands by seeing to it that we create no new problems for him to struggle with.

The recommendations were adopted.

The Committee on Canons presented the following resolution for final action:

RESOLVED: That Section 1 of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended by striking out the words "A President (who shall be a Presbyter of the Diocese)" so that the section shall read:

"The Convention shall annually elect a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Chancellor and a Registrar."

Adopted.

Mr. H. E. Rodgers for the Committee on Canons, made the following report:

The following amendment to the Canons has been proposed to the Committee:

Add to Canon 24, Section 2, as follows:

Section 2. Any parish or mission neglecting for two successive years to pay the full amount of its annual premium shall be deprived of its right to participate and vote in the proceedings of the Convention of the Diocese, according to the canons in that case made and provided, and shall continue so deprived until the said parish or mission has paid in full the annual premiums for two successive years, when it shall be restored to all of its canonical rights in the Convention of the Diocese.

The amendment does not penalize unorganized missions and therefore is not complete.

The amendment would, the committee thinks, be legal if adopted. Its adoption, however, is largely a matter of policy; therefore, being a question of policy, it is not primarily a matter for the Committee on Canons to determine. This amendment submitted to the Convention without recommendation to the Convention.

The Committee's feeling on the policy question is as follows: To penalize a small parish or mission for not paying its insurance premium, while technically justifiable, will deprive that parish or mission of its right to participate in the Diocesan Convention. If they may not participate they will not send delegates. If they do not send delegates and lose contact with the Church, they will drift backwards; certainly they will lose or take no interest in the affairs of the Church if they cannot participate in the deliberations and vote. It is better to aid them by paying the assessment rather than by "excommunicating" them.

On motion of Mr. McCullough B. Wilson, it was decided to vote on the proposed amendment to Canon 24, Section 2, and, after much discussion, a vote was taken and the resolution was lost.

The Report of the Church Pension Fund Committee of the Diocese was read by Mr. McCullough B. Wilson, as follows:

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PENSION FUND COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA TO THE ANNUAL CONVENTION

For many years now your Committee, through its Treasurer, has assisted the Church Pension Fund in the collection of assessments from the parishes and missions. Monthly statements are sent to the parishes and missions and monthly remittances are made to the Church Penion Fund Office in New York. Regularly, appeals have been sent to parishes and missions in arrears and from time to time the New York Office has been asked to assist in this work by writing direct to the clergy and treasurers and has cooperated in every way.

A large number of the parishes and missions make regular payments on the assessments and there seems to be general interest in the pension system in the Diocese. The amount collected each year is several thousand dollars and this has amounted to a large sum in the years that have passed since the inauguration of the Pension System.

Our record for 1940 is especially good and we hope it means that with improved conditions every parish and mission in the Diocese will pay the assessments regularly and in full. There is only one parish—no missions—with unpaid assessments for 1940, and this arrearage affects the pension benefits of one of our clergy. Unless all the assessments are paid in full each year a problem is created for the clergymen serving those places, if they have to retire for age or disability, or if they die. We might fall short in other things and be able to make adjustments, but the pension assessments have to be paid in full for our clergy and their families to be protected.

We are glad to be able to report no arrears for 21 of our clergy who serve about 49 parishes and missions, but there are arrears for 14 of the clergy, who serve 27 parishes and missions. In many cases the parishes these men are now serving are paying these assessments, but their records are not complete, because of assessments that were not paid by parishes and missions they formerly served.

Your Committee has made a careful study of the list of unpaid assessments. Each has a story of its own. Some are personal; some due to local conditions, especially during the depression period and some due to discouragement on the part of the clergy because of assessments that had accumulated, when they were without parishes and missions to pay the assessments for them. There is evidence that both the clergy and their treasurers have been kept informed both by the office of your Committee and the general office of the Church Pension Fund.

The fact is, though, that a number of the clergy are unprotected and that every effort should be made as soon as possible to help them to clear up their present records. While we have collected thousands of dollars, the amount still due is large, and in some cases the interest is more than the assessment. The amount due for the clergy now in the Diocese by the parishes and missions is \$3,614.01 and the interest is \$1,789.14. From those who have gone from us to other dioceses there is due by our parishes and missions \$834.73; interest \$719.24.

Our records show that other dioceses and the home office of the Church Pension Fund have also had difficulty in collecting all the assessments.

There is due by other dioceses for clergy who are now serving in this diocese \$491.80; Interest \$363.07; Non-parochial clergy \$1,847.39; Interest \$1,406.67; Personal \$92.75; Interest \$2.34.

There are many details connected with the collection of pension assessments and the time has come to accept the kind offer of the Church Pension Fund to relieve us of much of this work. While it may take the remaining part of this year for your Committee to prepare the way for this step by personal work with

the parishes and missions in arrears, we are of the opinion that we can safely make this change, through action by the Executive Council at the meeting at the beginning of 1942. In the mean-time, if this Committee is continued, we would recommend that it be given power to add to its number so that each district will be represented, so that some real personal work can be done between now and the end of the year.

Church Pension Fund Committee.

It was stated by Mr. Wilson that the recommendation of the Committee had been approved by the Executive Council. It also was approved by the Convention and the Committee was given power to add to its number.

After report by the Finance Department on the Treasurer's Report, the Rev. Walter R. Noe was re-elected Treasurer of the Diocese.

The Bishop nominated a Board of Examining Chaplains as follows:

Rev. Alexander Miller, Rev. E. W. Halleck, Rev. Charles A. Ashby, Rev. T. P. Noe and Rev. E. F. Moseley.

On motion of Mr. Junius D. Grimes, the nominations were confirmed.

On motion of the Rev. John R. Tolar, Chairman of the Department of Finance, it was decided to adopt a budget based on an expectation of \$35,000 for 1941 from the parishes and missions.

The Rev. Stephen Gardner presented certain alterations to the Constitution proposed in the General Convention of 1940 and to be finally acted on in the General Convention of 1943.

For the information of the Convention, a report of the temporary Youth Commission, which had been presented to and approved by the Executive Council, was read by the Rev. John C. Grainger, as follows:

REPORT OF THE TEMPORARY YOUTH COMMISSION, DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA, PRESENTED TO EXECUTIVE COUNCIL, MAY 13, 1941

We, the members of the temporary Youth Commission of the Diocese of East Carolina, have met twice since organization. An executive committee of the commission was set up and that committee has conducted a survey of the youth work being done by the Episcopal Church in this Diocese. On the basis of the findings of this survey we would make the following report to the Executive Council of the diocese.

Of necessity the report has been based only upon the survey sheets returned from fifty-two parishes and missions. We recognize, therefore, that the picture is not as complete as we should have desired. We do believe, however, that the findings herein presented picture a very representative cross-section of the diocese, and that they are indicative of the work now being done. We would state, too, that it has not been easy to arrive at some of the figures presented, because of the differences in the ways in which the report was interpreted by different people. We believe, however, that the summaries represent an approximately true picture.

In the first place, let us list, by convocations, those parishes and missions from which no reports have been received:

Convocation of Wilmington: St. Paul's, Clinton; Holy Innocents', Seven Springs; St. Paul's, Vanceboro; Grace Church, Whiteville; St. Gabriel's, Faison; All Souls', North West; St. Andrew's, Wrightsville.

Convocation of Edenton: St. James', Ayden; St. Thomas, Bath; Trinity, Chocowinity; St. Andrew's, Columbia; St. Paul's, Edenton (returned); St. John's, Grifton; Holy Trinity, Hertford; Zion, Jessama; St. Luke's, Roper; Grace Church, Woodville; St. Mark's, Roxobel; Galilee Mission, Creswell.

Convocation of Colored Church Workers: St. Joseph's, Fayetteville; St. Cyprian's, New Bern; St. Mark's, Wilmington; St. John-Evangelist, Edenton; St. Philips, Elizabeth City; St. Timothy's, Farmville; St. Andrew's, Greenville; St. Ann's, Roper; Brooklyn Mission, Wilmington.

This gives a total of twenty-eight parishes and missions from which we have received no reports, but one will notice immediately that most of the larger parishes and missions have been heard from. As other figures come in we shall be glad to include them. The final draft of the report was not made until the morning of May 13th, in order that as many figures as possible might be included.

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The survey sheets asked for information concerning all young men and women within the ages of 10-30, inclusive. The fifty-two parishes and missions reporting list 2,430 such young people. In making out our more detailed report we have divided these into four age groups, inclusive: 10-13, 14-20, 21-25 and 26-30. The figures for these groups are as follows:

Ages 10-13: Reported—677. In Church Schools—640. Three Junior Y. P. S. L.'s report a combined membership of 67; Regular Y. P. S. L.'s report, from this group 99; (These are below Y. P. S. L. age limits); one Boys' Club reports 15 members; one Junior Auxiliary reports 5 members; Servers' Guilds report, from this group 4 members; there are a number of Junior Choirs reported, but we have not included these, as we do not feel they should be listed as full-time youth organizations; 487 of this group are unreached by any Church organization, other than the Church School.

Ages 14-20: Reported 1,031. In Church School—620. Away at school, etc.—160. 25 Y. P. S. L.'s report from this age 463 members; two organized Older Youth Groups report 17; one Guild reports 9; two Junior Auxiliaries report 8; three Acolyte Guilds report 11. 363 of these young people are at home and not working in any Church organization other than Church School.

Ages 21-25: Reported—389. In Church School—67. Away at work, etc. 75. Y. P. S. L.'s report from this group 27 members; the Woman's Auxiliary has reached 40 girls; various Men's Groups have reached 17 boys; two Older Youth Groups include 21. 200 young men and women, at home, are not meeting with any Church organization other than Church School.

Ages 26-30: Reported—333. In Church School—54. Away at work, etc.—18. The Woman's Auxiliary has reached 50 of the young women; Men's Clubs have reached only 21 of the young men; the same two Older Youth Groups include 7; the Y. P. S. L. has 7, although this is above its age limit. 230 of our young adults are not connected with any active Church organization outside of the Church School.

We find, therefore, that of the 2,430 young people reported by these fifty-two parishes and missions 1,289 are not connected with any Church organization, with only 1,141 so enrolled.

One other pertinent fact discovered in the survey is the existence of about 64 isolated young people from the ages of 10 to 25, in places so small that there is no possibility of belonging to any active Church organization.

We, the members of the Commission, are very aware of the

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fact that there may be some few discrepancies in our figures, due to overlapping memberships, inaccuracies in reports and the like. We also recognize the fact that membership in an organization is no real barometer of spiritual awareness or of religious zeal. There are no doubt many young persons who are vitally related to their Church and still are not on the rolls of any organization, just as there are certainly many who are listed as members of different groups but take no vital part in the activities of that group. However, we do not feel that such possibilities can detract from the authenticity of the general picture which the above figures reveal.

It seems to us very evident that the Diocese of East Carolina at present is doing a very inadequate work with the young people within its fold. Were it not for one or two very active parishes and missions the picture would be even more astoundingly inadequate. At least five places report no organizations whatsoever for their youth, outside of a Church School and perhaps a choir. The Church Schools are reaching most of the younger children but the enrollment is appallingly low in the upper age levels. There are, as we say, a few places which are very evidently accomplishing a fine piece of work with all age groups. However, the majority of the fields fall between the two extremes—with a certain amount of work going on (generally in the high school age group), but with nothing like an adequate youth program.

It has been constantly affirmed that the great difficulty with most youth work in the Church and outside is the failure to secure adequate adult leadership for youth. This cry has come from the young people of the Church themselves and also from the rectors. Only 23 of the 52 parishes and missions reporting list any adults interested in youth work. Some admit their inability to secure such help. Those parishes and missions which show good reports are those places where there are a number of older men and women who are willing and ready to work with the rectors in the youth program. It is also evident, from the failure of many of the clergy to respond to the survey, the constant prodding necessary to get results from others, and the careless inadequacies of the reports of many who did respond, that too many of our clergy do not feel the importance of the work with their youth, either do not take the program seriously, have not the time, or just do not know how to go about the whole business.

Our Presiding Bishop has said that we must have a definite "Forward Movement" on the part of the youth of the Church, if the whole Church expects to march "Forward in Service."

To the National Council he said, as quoted in one of our Church papers, "If we fail with youth, that is the greatest failure of all." We feel, therefore, very strongly, that the time has come in the Diocese of East Carolina when the whole Church awaken to its tremendous responsibility toward the young people. Many of our new mission fields are almost completely young people's work. We have a job to do.

It would seem imperative, then, that the Diocese of East Carolina, in line with the expanding policy of the National Church's Division of Youth, needs some one central guiding force to oversee the work which is being done for the youth of the dio-We believe that such a force should consist of one small group of men and women, old and young, clerical and lay, which would be responsible for the promotion and guidance of all of the work among young people in every parish and mission in the diocese, including especially those in the age group from 14-25, on whom the greatest emphasis should be placed. Especially is it important that some kind of a program be mapped out for the so-called isolated youth group in the diocese. This central force would also be responsible for the promotion of the ideals and programs of the new United Youth Program of the Church in the Diocese of East Carolina. It would aid all rectors in the youth program, advise in the setting up of suitable organizations, make available good program materials, and the like.

Wherefore, we, the temporary Youth Commission of the Diocese of East Carolina, having been appointed such by the Bishop, do hereby recommend to the Executive Council of the Diocese:

- 1. That said Executive Council shall set up as one of its departments a separate Department of Youth, which department shall direct all youth work in the Diocese, promoting and guiding the same.
- 2. That this Department of Youth shall consist of one clergyman, one layman, one laywoman and two young people (one of whom shall be 20 years of age or over and the other over 14 but under 20). Only the chairman of this department shall necessarily be a member of the Executive Council of the Diocese.
- 3. That this Department shall set up an Advisory Committee of Young People, which committee shall function under the Department. The chairman of this Committee shall be one of the two young people on the Department. The action of the Committee shall be purely in an advisory capacity. The chairman of the Department may meet with the Committee, but shall have no vote in its findings.

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- 4. That this Advisory Committee of Young People shall consist of three representatives of the Y. P. S. L., two representatives from other Youth Groups over twenty years of age, one representative from other organizations under twenty years of age, one representative from the College Group, and two representatives from the isolated group. The setting-up of this Committee shall be left up to the Department.
- 5. That this set-up for Diocesan Youth Work be organized immediately, so that it can begin functioning with the opening of the fall program, 1941.

The Rev. W. Tate Young was asked to contact all the clergy of the diocese in the interest of the proper observance of Magna Carta Day.

The report of the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution was presented by the Superintendent, Mr. M. D. Whisnant.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE THOMP-SON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTE

To you through whose efforts the work at the Thompson Orphanage is made possible, we wish to present a brief survey of the costs of our operations and of the sources from which the money is obtained.

Our budget of annual living costs is now \$31,000.00. This is somewhat higher than for the last few years, though not as large as the time before the depression. The greater part of this increase is found in the salary schedule due to the following additions to the staff.

First, in line with other institutions of our kind, we now have a full-time case worker whose services assure us, through careful investigation, that the children whom we do admit are in real need of our care; and that those whom we do not take can find that care with the family or some other type of assistance.

Then, we have added a general handy-man, the husband of one of our matrons, whose job is to look after the property, and with the help of the boys keep it in good repair. He is a carpenter and painter, and though it means an increase in our staff, it also means that less is spent for outside help. And it is in line with the policy that keeping property in constant repair is cheaper in the end. Our plant, valued at \$588,651.00 and praised by all who have surveyed it, is worth too much to allow its neglect and abuse.

And for the first time we have the salary of chaplain in addition to that of superintendent, since we do not have a resident clergyman.

Our other item of heavy proportions is that of food for the children, and this we are hoping to reduce with the products from our garden. We are already enjoying the spring vegetables, and are planning to can the surplus products during the summer. This garden, by the way, is not only a financial saving but provides a splendid work program for the boys.

The clothing of our children is generously carried by the Auxiliaries and by individuals, and their education is provided in the city schools.

Now, to meet expenses we have several sources of income. From the Duke Endowment we receive a little less than \$2,000.00 a year; from our own Endowment, about \$6,500.00. From County support or from parents, we receive about \$1,000.00, which we hope to increase and which has already shown some increase through the efforts of our case worker. But the greater part of our income, about \$20,000.00 or 2-3 of the whole, must come from the churches, either from the Thanksgiving offering, from the diocesan budget, or from individual or church contributions throughout the year.

During the year 1940, the Orphanage cared for 95 children. Of this number, 19 were placed—1 at college, 5 in Business school, 5 self supporting. There are 82 in the Orphanage at present; 7 of these will graduate in June. 1 is planning to enter nursing school, 1 is preparing to take training for a Laboratory Technician and 5 are going to work.

Our most generous friend, Dr. W. Myers Hunter, who has so generously donated his services for the past 43 years reports that the health of the children as usual has been remarkably good, and above the average.

A work and training program has been put into effect which includes all our children. This work is closely supervised and rewarded according to the job done. If a child does not do a

good job, then some privilege is denied this child. Each child is required to do a certain amount of work for the institution each day. As a result of this program, many improvements to the grounds and buildings have been made. At the present we have an 8 acre garden. Growing in the garden is green beans, corn, tomatoes, May peas, onions, cabbage, okra, beets, carrots, curumbers, squash, pepper and an assortment of greens. Some of this we are using now. The other will be used in season. The boys have done all of this work except the ploughing. The girls do the laundry work, mend, cook, and sew.

We believe that the last year has been a good one. Our job of selecting the most worthy children and of finding places for those who have graduated has been done much better because of the help of our trained case worker. The children are responding well to our new work and training program. The Board of Managers and the various committees are capable and interested. There are 82 fine children looking to us for support and encouragement. I pledge my best efforts to this task and I know that I can count on your support.

In making a report for the University of the South, the Rev. Mortimer Glover stated that during the past three years many of the buildings had been repaired; that the enrollment had increased so that capacity is almost reached and that the University is able to operate without a deficit with the aid of the Sustaining Fund. The

Diocese of East Carolina was asked to help in the matter of operation.

The report of the Committee on Insurance was presented as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

It is with a deep feeling of sadness that this committee reports the passing away of its Chairman, the Reverend John Benners Gibble, and we know that his hands were filled with deeds of Charity which are the Golden Keys that Open the Palace of Eternity. And when the western hills obscured life's sun, he fell asleep in the promise of the dawn of a never ending day.

The committee has worked as it has in the past to see that the proper protection is afforded on the schedule. There have been some losses during the year and they have either been adjusted or in the process of adjustment.

The total insurance carried at the present time amounts to \$75,185.00, and inasmuch as we had a complete check made on the rates and each piece of property inspected, we would recommend no changes at this time.

The report of the Trustees of the Diocese was presented by the Assistant Secretary and Treasurer. (See Appendix "D"). At the request of the Trustees of the Diocese, the Bishop stated that the funds of the Trustees had been audited to March 31, 1941 and that the audit had been approved by the Trustees.

Trustees of the University of the South: Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D. Mr. Alonzo Jeffress for three years.

Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution: Mrs. S. W. Tillinghast, three years; Mrs. J. E. F. Hicks, three years.

The report of the Committee on the Diocesan Debt was read by Mr. Guy C. Harding as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DIOCESAN DEBT

At the meeting of the Convention of 1940, held in Wilmington, the following resolution was adopted:

"That the Department of Finance be and same is hereby directed to consolidate the indebtedness of the Diocese existing on January 1, 1939, with the unpaid indebtedness incurred during the year 1939; and apportion the aggregate amount thereof among the different parishes and missions on the basis of their respective number of communicants and that each said parish and mission be requested to assume direct responsibility for the amounts so determined to be their proper share thereof and that each parish and mission be given credit for the amounts paid by them respectively on their said shares as requested in the resolutions passed by the conferences at Washington and White Lake and the Coordination Committee appointed by Bishop Darst."

At a meeting of the Finance Department, with a special Debt Committee which had been appointed by the Bishop, in Kinston, on February 14, 1940, the following resolutions were adopted:

- 1. "That each parish and mission be apportioned \$2.00 per member, based on the list reported January 1, 1939."
- 2. "That each parish and mission be credited with amounts paid since November 1, 1939."
- 3. "That each parish and mission raise its quota as it sees fit."
- 4. "That the treasurer of the diocese send to each parish and mission a statement of the amount apportioned and the amount paid."
- 5. "That St. James, Wilmington, be excepted, by their request, and that their offer as regards the debt be accepted."

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At December 31, 1939, as shown by the Treasurer's Report, the debt amounted to \$22,315.00. At the time of the Convention of 1940, the debt had been reduced to \$19,195.00. At the end of 1940, as the Treasurer's Report will show, the debt had been reduced to \$12,516.80. During the year 1941 payments have been made by several parishes and missions, which will make a further reduction in the debt.

Apportionments were given to seventy-six parishes and missions, and forty-eight have made some payments. Fourteen parishes and missions have completed their payments. Only twenty-eight parishes and missions have failed to make any payment, and some of these have reported that they are now at work on the matter and expect to pay in full before the end of the year.

While the whole amount has not been collected, your Committee feels that real progress has been made and that most of the parishes and missions feel some sense of responsibility for completing the work as soon as possible.

Knowing that this matter would be reported to the Convention several parishes and missions have given the committee assurance that it is their intention of paying in full before the end of the year. We would therefore recommend that the Committee be continued and that the same plan be used for the rest of the year.

The Committee is deeply indebted to Mr. Guy C. Harding who for several months has served as Chairman of the special Committee on the debt and has given unsparingly of his time.

An address was made by Rev. W. H. R. Jackson, Chaplain at Fort Jackson, S. C.

Rev. R. I. Johnson read the report of the Good Shepherd Hospital, New Bern, as follows:

REPORT OF GENERAL MANAGER, GOOD SHEPHERD HOSPITAL

Rt. Rev. Bishop, Members of the Convention and Friends:

The Good Shepherd Hospital is now in its third year of operation and is steadily realizing its mission of bringing the healing ministries of our Lord through the Church to a people who need these ministries more than is often understood, even by themselves. What the services of the hospital reveal from time to time is an amazing condition of morbidity among thousands whose economical level makes it extremely difficult for them to obtain the relief they need.

Recently, we passed our 1000th patient. Our annual report to the Duke Endowment shows that in 1940 we had 115 full pay patients; 143 part-pay patients; 124 free patients, or a total admitted and treated of 364. We gave 3,508 free days of care. The per capita rate for 1940 was 2.90. I am glad to be able to report that for 1941 the rate will be only 2.60. Starting with a per capita cost of 3.42 in 1938 you can see that we have steadily decreased the per capita cost of operation.

Total income for 1940 was \$14,869.33. Operating expenses were \$13,132.30.

The money has been derived from full-pay and part-pay patients; the Duke Endowment; the City of New Bern; the County of Craven through the Welfare Department; and Donations from that very important group which we call "Friends of the Good Shepherd Hospital" people in various parts of the country and the Diocese who make small contributions from time to time to make it possible to carry on the work. Contributions in the form of linens and general supplies have come in considerable abundance from the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of East Carolina and from the Diocese of Pennsylvania. The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of East Carolina has been especially generous and helpful for which we wish to record our deep appreciation. More and more people from the parishes and missions in the Diocese visit the Hospital and give us great encouragement by their interest. These "friends of the Good Shepherd Hospital" we hope to see become an increasing company through the years, people who will make small contributions year after year that will fill in the gap made by our large services to free patients.

As during last year, we have been especially helpful to public

health agencies this year by the use of our emergency and clinical department by the County Health Department. Here we have made x-ray pictures and fluoroscopes of hundreds of school children; here we are steadily training mothers to use the hospital for deliveries and are helping to make it possible for them to do so. Dr. McGeachey and his staff are warm in their praise of the manner in which the hospital is operated.

Our professional staff remains about the same. Dr. Mumford, one of the colored physicians, has lost his health and is no longer active, but the four white men, Drs. Duffey, Wadsworth, Ashford, and Kafer are still serving as also are Drs. Mann, Fisher and Martin, the three colored men. Miss Hennie, our United Thank Offering nurse who serves as superintendent is handling her difficult job well, and will study for six weeks at New York University this summer.

We are grateful to Bishop Darst for his continued encouragement, to the Rev. Mr. Williams whose presence and help are invaluable in local administration, and to the Rev. Mr. Noe, chairman of the Board of Trustees for his constant and able leadership and counsel.

As the years pass we grow more and more hopeful for the future of the Good Shepherd. Its friends are increasing; the people it serves are becoming more and more aware of the necessity of trying to pay their bills; and recently a good friend of the hospital in the person of Miss Mary Johnston of Southern Ohio, has established for us a revolving fund, to which, if we can keep on adding through the years, we shall reach a condition of stability and assurance.

We are grateful that the encouragement of the Diocese has made it possible to have the very joyful experience of doing this work in the Name of our Lord and His Church and day by day we thank God for what it means to so many sufferers as well as its significance in the vindication of the Church missions to "those who toil along the weary road with painful steps and slow".

The report of the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese was read by the Rev. Mortimer Glover. (See Appendix "C").

An address was made by Mr. W. G. Gaither, Chairman of the Committee on the Laymen's Thank Offering.

RESOLVED: That this Convention express its grateful thanks to the Rector and Vestry of Christ Church Parish, the ladies of the Church, the Mayor of Elizabeth City, the Choir and the many hosts and hostesses of the various delegates. The Convention is also cognizant of the gracious recognition by the local press.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this Convention.

It was stated by the Bishop that it was his firm conviction that we shall not do our full duty until a summer camp is provided for the young people of the Convocation of Colored Church Workers.

Resolution No. 2 of the Department of Finance was adopted as follows:

RESOLVED: That the Treasurer of the Diocese be authorized to pay the expenses to the Convention of the clergymen not yet connected with the Diocese who are now located and serving therein and of such clergymen as may have been prevented from being present at the opening of the Convention and also Candidates for Holy Orders and Postulants who are now serving in the Diocese.

RESOLVED FURTHER: That the Treasurer be instructed to pay the Sexton of Christ Church \$5.00 for services during the Convention.

On motion, it was decided that the Convention will adjourn after the reading of the Bishop's address and his benediction.

Mr. J. A. Moore suggested that some effort be made to raise special funds for immediate needs made necessary by the National Defense Program.

A report of St. Mary's School and Junior College was presented by Rev. Henry F. Kloman as follows:

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF SAINT MARY'S SCHOOL,

Incorporated

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Incorporation, the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith the report for the academic year 1940-41.

Since the Diocesan Conventions of 1940 the following meetings of the governing boards of Saint Mary's have been held: April 2nd, 1940, Executive Committee; May 28th, 1940, Board Trustees, Annual Meeting; June 3rd, 1940, Executive Committee; June 14h, 1940, Executive Committee; June 17th, 1940, Committee on Sprinkler System; December 10th, 1940, Executive Committee; February 19th, 1941, Executive Committee.

Important matters considered at these meetings include:

First: Approval of Reports of Officers and Auditors.

Second: Approval of Library expansion, Music Building Studio, Warehouse and Recreation Centre.

Third: The decision to install a Sprinkler System in Smedes, East and West wings which was completed before the opening of school in September and has been in satisfactory service during the session. Supplementing this installation extensive changes in vestibules and stairways were necessary and have been completed. Approximate total cost \$12,000.00.

Fourth: A full time Alumnae Secretary service was authorized and Miss Sarah Vann of Franklinton, North Carolina, is now employed in this position.

Fifth: Landscaping of Grounds, tree planting, improvment of walks and roads.

Sixth: Retirement plan for Teachers.

Seventh: The 1942 Centennial in connection with which a survey and report was authorized by Marts and Lundy of New York which is now available. Decision was approved to open the 1941-1942 Centennial Session on September 1st that the School events may be held as part of the Commencement Exercises in Mid-May, 1942.

Since my last report the Rev. I. Wayne Hughes of Henderson, in place of Mr. Geo. C. Royal of Goldsboro, retired, has been elected to membership on the Board of Trustees for the Diocese of North Carolina.

The Rev. J. B. Gibble, D. D., of Wilmington has died leaving a vacancy in Board Members from the Diocese of East Carolina.

The 1940-41 school session has been most satisfactory. We have a capacity registration of 225 Resident students and in addition 46 Day and Special Students, total 271. In this registration nineteen States are represented with 174 Students from North Carolina, 34 from Virginia, 14 from South Carolina and with from one to seven registrations from other States. Religious affiliations are 141 Episcopal, 51 Methodist, 39 Presbyterian, 28 Baptist, with one or two students from six other denominations.

As this report is written the applications of 166 students have been accepted for the 1941-42 session of whom 61 are coming to Saint Mary's for the first time and 85 are returning students. Another capacity enrollment is indicated.

The Trustees welcome this means, however formal and inadequate, to express their sincere appreciation for the devotion and the professional skill with which the affairs of this institution have been administered in all of its departments during the past year.

A condensed financial statement of Assets and Liabilities of Trustees funds from the Auditor's report for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1940, is attached.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS



BISHOP'S ADDRESS

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of East Carolina.

"Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ."

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It is not my purpose tonight to give a stereotyped report of our activities during the past year, as all of this is contained in the statistical information that I presented to the Convention this morning. Neither is it my intention to dwell on the work of the various departments of our Diocesan organization although we have accomplished much for which we may be humbly proud; but rather would I stress the place the Church must occupy and the part it must play in this hour of doubt and dread and dangerous opportunity.

I believe in my soul that as individuals, and as a Church, we have "come to the Kingdom for such a time as this," and I pray God that we may have the wisdom and the courage to enter into our inheritance.

In any great undertaking, three elements must be considered:

- 1. The need for such an undertaking.
- 2. The necessary resources and equipment.
- 3. The purpose and objective that must be realized.

Surely the blindest and most indifferent among us must realize the need in this hour of tragic, heart breaking world disaster. In this hour when the high and holy principles of Jesus are being trampled under foot in a large part of the world. In this hour when the powers of Hell are crashing against the citadel of our faith; for, it is not some remote and unreal danger that we are considering today, not some battle that may have to be waged at some distant period in the world's history. The hour is NOW—the call of God to go forward is sounding in our ears TODAY.

Surely, the Church faces its greatest opportunity to demonstrate its divine mission, and those of us who make up its militant membership cannot evade our responsibility without repudiating the Christ whose name we bear.

The fight is on, and upon the issue of that conflict depends the peace and safety of the world for which the Lord Jesus died.

The kingdoms of hate and fear and selfishness and greed battle for the soul of the world, and the Church alone, renewed in spirit, consecrated to its task, has the power to transform those destructive kingdoms into the Kingdom of our God and His Christ.

As we face the necessity for the rebuilding of our poor, broken world today, we may well ask ourselves if our resources are sufficient and our spiritual equipment adequate.

Our Government, faced with what may prove to be the greatest crisis in our national history, has made such a survey; and finding that its equipment for defence was totally inadequate, has given itself with unprecedented energy and at tremendous cost to the completion of a defence program strong enough to resist the storms that may break upon our shores tomorrow.

The Church likewise must be honest enough to take stock of its spiritual resources, and humble enough to acknowledge and repent of its failures and its sins if it is to play its full and glorious part in the redemption of the world.

In order to take its full part in the plans of God at this high hour, the Church must first rid itself of those deadening influences that have nearly paralyzed its usefulness, and by God's grace open the way for the reception of that life-giving power that will make it invincible as it goes forward in the fight against the forces of evil in God's world.

It is hardly necessary for me to enumerate those influences that have made the Church so feeble and futile at the time when governments are demanding the best equipment and God is calling for nothing less than utter loyalty to His Kingdom.

We of the Church know how sadly we have failed Him.

We know that we have been worldly and sinful. We know that we have been disloyal in our response to His call for worship. We know that we have not loved one another as He has loved us. We know that our vision of the Church's life has been, too often, no wider than the comfortable well being of our own parish or mission. We know that neither with our lives, nor with our money, have we joyfully gone with Christ to meet the tragic needs of our community, our state, and our world.

If we know these things to be true, and I believe that some of us do know them to be true, what are we going to do about it? What steps are we going to take to bring the Church in our parish and diocese and world back into line with the glorious, dangerous, victorious program of our Sovereign Lord God?

Our Presiding Bishop has called the Church to Go Forward in Service. In this and in many other dioceses a Roll Call has been taken to determine our numerical strength and to enlist men and women in more definite service for Christ. In many parishes a service of reconsecration has been held, and we are hoping that such a service will be held in every parish in East Carolina on Whitsunday or at some other suitable time between now and Trinity Sunday.

But, fine as this is, it is not enough. A Roll Call may result in nothing more than added and somewhat embarrassing statistical information.

An act of Reconsecration may be nothing more than a transient desire to be a little better than we have been. This hour demands more than the filling out of a questionnaire or the signing of a piously worded vow, or the willingness to take part in some unusual service of rededication.

It means the cleansing of our souls and the surrender of our selfish wills. It means the joyful enlistment of our lives in the hard and glorious service of God.

The Government has called the roll of the youth of our country and hundreds of thousands of our sons have responded to the call. They have pledged their allegiance to the flag and to the country for which it stands, but that was not the end; that was the beginning. They are wearing the uniform of their country today and they are preparing to defend its liberties with their lives if needs be.

Long ago, you and I enlisted in a much greater war. In a solemn hour, we stood before the Altar and the Cross and we promised to be Christ's faithful soldiers and servants until our life's end. The hands of the Bishop were laid upon our bowed heads and the spirit of God entered into our receptive souls. What have we done, O merciful God, what have we done with the gift of the Holy Ghost?

The Church and the individual, the parish and the Diocese, you and I must recapture this gift of grace, must turn from our littleness and worldliness and our sins and find the peace and beauty and power of Discipleship where alone it can be found, at the foot of an accepted redeeming Cross.

The world IS sad and broken today. Men and nations are passing through paths of agony, paths marked by blood and sweat and toil and tears. Truth seems to be suspended in its dying agony on the cross of hatred and injustice. Wrong seems to be occupying the throne, but it cannot last. The Cross triumphed over hate and hell two thousand years ago. The Cross will triumph today if you and I and the Church of the living God, of which we are a part, are brave enough and big enough to take that Cross of sacrificial devotion into our lives and carry it on and on until the shadows break and the morning comes. Until the forces of hate and sin and oppression are driven from the garden of God's fair world, and the peace for which the King of all life died covers the world in which He must forever reign.

As we of East Carolina dedicate ourselves anew tonight, may we say, in spite of storm and stress and fear—"We thank God that we have come to the Kingdom for such a time as this."



During the year under review a liquidating dividend in the amount of \$50.00 was received from the International Match Company Certificate of Deposit and shown as a receipt under Diocesan Support. As authorized by a resolution passed at the 57th Annual Convention page 94 of the Journal, we have made the following adjustments in the Assets and Liabilities of the Diocese:

APPENDIX "C"

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA

Rt. Rev. Father in God, and Members of the Diocesan Convention—

In reporting the accomplishments of the Woman's Auxiliary of this diocese since the last Diocesan Convention in January 1940, I shall pass hurriedly over the work done during the time which remained in our last triennium. Be it sufficient to say that according to a survey taken by the Woman's Auxiliary, a conscientious effort was made to present to every woman in the diocese for lengthy consideration every resolution accepted in the 1938 Triennial Meeting. We therefore entered the new triennium with a "clean sheet."

It is interesting to note that the Woman's Auxiliary of this diocese had present at the great Triennial Meeting held in Kansas City, five delegates, five alternates, five visitors, three members of the Youth Conference, and two colored delegates. I believe this can not be matched by any other diocese in our Church. We are indeed proud of this record and we realize that we were a privileged group. We also realize that with this privilege we also have a great responsibility.

Immediately upon our return from Kansas City we worked out a program for the year. A program which we felt would furnish a foundation for the entire triennium. We realized the material given us at Triennial was for immediate use—all of it had to be broadcast at once—no part of it could be retained for future presentation—for who knows what lies in the future of our Church or our country! The material was allocated for study to the members of the Executive Board and papers were written applying the subject matter to our own diocese

—how we, in East Carolina, could use it best. These papers were mimeographed, made into Auxiliary Packets and sent to every Auxiliary in the diocese. The material in this Packet paralleled the suggested programs in the Diocesan Auxiliary Program. In other words it was made possible for every woman to carry out the Diocesan Auxiliary Program in its entirety. Through this Packet our women had the opportunity of learning not only Auxiliary work but the work of the whole Church. We feel that the Ten Year Plan of our Presiding Bishop is not only a matter for the clergy to try to present to the parishes but a matter for the Woman's Auxiliary to try to inform the women of the diocese so that the efforts of the clergy will fall upon prepared, receptive soil.

In like manner the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary stand ready to help any and all of the clergy to establish Unified Parish programs in every parish in the diocese. I repeat, we stand ready to answer any call to help. We feel that we must be called as we would not presume to enter any parish and suggest how it should be run in order to have a Unified Program. There is no parish too small, no parish too large for a Unified Parish Program.

We also ask of the clergy in whose parishes or Missions a Woman's Auxiliary has not been organized, to enlist our assistance in establishing such a group as we feel confident that the Woman's Auxiliary can stimulate the activity in any parish.

The Woman's Auxiliary is venturing into new fields and we are asking the assistance of the clergy to help make this venture a success. Together with the diocesan Department of Religious Education and the Commission on Youth, the Woman's Auxiliary is holding a joint Institute at Camp Leach on June 9-14. Courses have been arranged so that a person can take courses in all of the three sponsoring departments. May I beg of each one of you to see that your vestry invest the large sum of

\$6.00 to make it possible for you to send one person to this Institute. Your Church School, the work among the youth in your parish and perhaps the Woman's Auxiliary in your parish will be benefited. Let us see how big a success we can make of this Institute—other dioceses have succeeded and so can we, but we must offer a united front.

This report would not be complete without a cursory review of the work done by our departments:

Religious Education—The work of this department has grown in interest and activity. It is in a very healthy state in four of the large parishes. In others there is a growing desire to develop and go forward. The drawbacks are:—only one meeting a month, small groups, women whose time is too full to allow reading and study, inability to listen, lack of training and experience in putting over a program. Some of these difficulties are improving as the work goes on.

Supply Department:—The most significant work of this department has been the voluntary broadening of the scope of their supply work by the Auxiliary branches. The allotments were filled as usual, showing a small increase. Clothing for Thompson Orphanage amounted to more than half of the total supply work for the diocese. Thirty-three boxes of supplies were sent to the Good Shepherd Hospital, twelve boxes of linen and Christmas gifts to Thompson Orphanage, eleven boxes to Galilee and Inland Waterway Missions. Our Lenten sewing project for the Good Shepherd Hospital has become an established annual project. We feel that the women in East Carolina are becoming more conscious of the usefulness and the need of the Supply work.

Christian Social Relation Department.—This department has progressed. In addition to its usual cooperation with already existing organizations for relief, a great effort has been made to cooperate with other communions. Interest has been stimulated concerning the refugee work

being done by our Church and the usual interest in the social work connected with the various institutions in the diocese has been manifested.

United Thank Offering—There has been a deeper realization of the spiritual value of the United Thank Offering. There are ten parishes that were 100% according to their report, that is every member of the Auxiliary a sharer in the United Thank Offering. We welcome the knowledge that the men of this diocese have started a United Offering. Let me beg of you not to lose the spiritual side of this offering if you want to make it a success. Guard against making it "just another offering."

Promotional Department—It would take hours to relate the activities of this department. Its scope is so broad and its work untiringly executed. It has mailed out to each Auxiliary Every Member Canvas Material, 72 November issues of Forth and a like number of packets from the department of Promotion in New York. Two hundred and fifty Handbooks for the use of Parish Officers, Church in Action mailed regularly to each Auxiliary. An essay contest was again offered by this department with a Kanuga scholarship as the reward, but we are distressed to state that no entries were received. This department of the Woman's Auxiliary is handling all the publicity connected with the promotion of the Camp Leach Institute for all the departments interested. This in itself is a Through this department a diocesan readlarge order. ing chain is developing. Seventy-five women reported having read "The Practice of the Presence of God."

We feel that there has been a marked increase in the spiritual life of the women in this diocese. More Corporate Communions, more Quiet Days of Prayer, greater outflowing of spiritual atmosphere evidenced in the meetings, less reserve shown in the discussion of spiritual subjects, a real demand for spiritual programs, a frankness of admission of our failure in the past and a desire to do something about it.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

January 23, 1940

The Executive Council of the Diocese met in St. James' Parish House, Wilmington, N. C., at 4:30 P. M., January 23, 1940.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Bishop.

The roll was called showing the following present:

Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D., Bishop; Rev. W. R. Noe, member ex-officio, Secretary and Treasurer; Rev. C. E. Williams, liams, Rev. John R. Tolar, Mr. W. G. Gaither ,Mr W B Campbell, Mr.C. R. Wheatly, Rev. E. F. Moseley, Rev. J, R, Rountree

The Rev. John R. Tolar, Chairman of the Department of Finance, presented the budget that he expected to present to the Convention and certain changes in the Treasurer's report that had been approved at the meeting of the Department. The budget items and the changes in the Treasurer's Report were approved.

The Bishop told of the work being done at Penderlea, Pender County, and the need for a worker there.

The Executive Council approved the plans of the Bishop for aiding the worker after the Bishop stated that he would try to find some way to raise the money needed for the salary.

After a report by the Rev. Jack R. Rountree for the Committee on Policy and Evaluation, it was decided that a part of the report should be presented to the 1940 Convention and that it should be presented in a complete form at the 1941 Convention.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

January 25, 1940

On the afternoon of January 25, 1940, in St. James' Parish House, Wilmington, the Executive Council met and after the Roll Call and reading of the minutes, right much time was spent in discussing some of the matters that had been presented to the Convention.

The Bishop appointed the Chairmen of the Departments as follows:

Department of Missions and Church Extension, Mr. George B. Elliott.

Department of Christian Education, Rev. E. F. Moseley.

Department of Christian Social Relations, Rev. Mortimer Glover.

Department of Finance, Rev. John R. Tolar.

Department of Evangelism, Rev. Jack R. Rountree.

Department of Promotion, Rev. Alexander Miller.

The Executive Council agreed to accept members of the Department who were appointed by the chairmen.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL KINSTON, N. C., APRIL 25, 1940

The Executive Council of the Diocese met in St. Mary's, Kinston, at 10:30 A. M., April 25, 1940 and was opened with prayer by the Bishop.

The roll was called showing the following present:

Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D.; Rev. Walter R. Noe; Rev. Mortimer Glover; Rev. E. F. Moseley; Rev. Jack R. Rountree; Rev. C. E. Williams; Rev. John R. Tolar; W. G. Gaither; Mrs. Louis J. Poisson and Mrs. W. O. S. Sutherland.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Bishop spoke of the community church work now being done at Penderlea and recommended that we have some part in the support of the clergyman in charge. On motion of the Rev. John R. Tolar, it was decided to make a contribution of \$12.50 a month, beginning with May, 1940.

A letter from the Vice-Chancellor of the University of the South, asking the Diocese to help with the support of the University, beginning with 1940, was read and, on motion, the Bishop appointed the following committee to see what can be done to raise at least \$500.00 by the time of the meeting of the Annual Convention of the Diocese in 1941, as follows: Rev. Mortimer Glover; Rev. W. Tate Young and Mr. J. Q. Beckwith.

After discussion of the pension arrearages, Mr. McCullough B. Wilson of Wilmington, was requested to serve as a committee of one to see what can be done in bringing payments up to date.

The report of the Finance Department was presented by the Rev. John R. Tolar, Chairman and was approved.

Rev. Jack R. Rountree mentioned the contest on Evangelism which was held by the Woman's Auxiliary and moved a vote of thanks to all those who had a part in it. Adopted.

The Rev. E. F. Moseley announced the plans for the conference arranged by the Department of Christian Education and the Woman's Auxiliary to be held at Camp Leach the week of July 28th and, on motion of the Rev. Jack R. Rountree, the plans were approved.

After discussion of Camp Leach, the whole matter was referred to the special Camp Leach Committee until other appointments are made.

On motion of Mr. W. G. Gaither it was decided to refer the canon on the Trustees of the Diocese to the Committee on Canons with view to clarifying same and of enlarging the membership.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

REPORTS FROM CLERGY

REV. JOHN HARTLEY, Ph. D., P. O. Kinston, N. C.

Through the Secretary of the Convention you are hereby advised of my increasing disability to perform any official acts. I have absolutely none to report for the year 1940. Each passing year makes it less and less likely that I shall ever again be privileged to attend another Diocesan Convention.

REV. H. A. PARRIS, M. D., Rich Square, N. C.

At the time of my last report I was helping St. Ambrose Church, Raleigh. My services continued with them until they were able to secure a permanent rector a few weeks ago.

From my last report to the termination of my service with St. Ambrose Church there were:

Twenty-two (22) Celebrations of the Holy Communion with more than 1,100 Communicants.

Two baptisms—One infant and one juvenile.

Five adults were prepared and presented for confirmation.
One burial service; and in addition, extra services in Advent and Lent.

I have also assisted at times in Rocky Mount. Here I had morning prayer and services twice; evening prayer and sermon 5 times; celebration of Holy Communion once.

At Tarboro I served at one burial service. At Rich Square (There is no Episcopal Church here) I have served at one burial and had one marriage, besides lending such assistance as I may, without sacrifice of principle, to the brethren of the separated groups.

A salutary influence is exercised, in this respect, and is making for distinctly greater dignity and order in the public worship of Almighty God.

REV. VERNON EARL ARTIS, Bishop Payne Divinity School.

On the morning of September the 7th, 1940, I began my work as the Minister of Music in the Bishop Payne Divinity School, and on the 17th of the same month was enrolled as a student of the Virginia State College for Negroes.

At the Seminary I serve as organist at the following services: Morning prayer on Mondays; evensong daily except on Saturday, and at the Holy Communion on Sunday mornings. I instruct the choir on Mondays at 2 p. m. Optional music such

as sight-singing and organ I teach on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of each week according to schedule.

At St. Stephen's Church, the city parish, I have served as assistant at Communion on four occasions, as chorister nearly every Sunday; as preacher on Monday during Holy Week.

During the Week of Prayer at Virginia State College I was one of the scheduled speakers at Vespers.

REV. J. B. BROWN, Washington, N. C.

I was very glad to hear from the Diocese of East Carolina one more time, for the year 1940, was the only year in over 27 years of service that I failed to receive any. It was very hard with me at first to be without responsibility to the Diocese; but I am thankful that our Heavenly Father permitted me to live to retire. The care that I received in the Hospital of the Good Shepherd at New Bern and the skill of Drs. Duffy and Martain, contributed very much for my good health today—thanks to the Bishop, yourself and the Diocese of East Carolina.

Charles Johnson and myself have been on the go almost the entire year. I celebrated the Holy Communion at St. Paul's Church, Washington, 9 times; St. Mary's, Belhaven, 8; St. Jude's, Aurora, 8; and St. Thomas' Church, Sladesville, 11 times. I preached 5 times, 2 in Virginia and 3 in East Carolina and addressed Church schools 5 times, marriages, 4; assisted in 11 burials. I also held services and preached 14 times at the State Prison Institution. I have been active in the Civic League, American Red Cross, as Vice-Chairman, and City Associate Charity. I am thankful to be able to so report my activities for the year 1940.

I shall do my best to be at the Convention in Elizabeth City in May.



EXTRACTS FROM CANONS OF THE GENERAL

CONVENTION

CANON 43

OF THE DUE CELEBRATION OF SUNDAYS

All persons within this church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, by regular participation in the public worship of the Church, by hearing the Word of God read and taught, and by other acts of devotion and works of charity, using all godly and sober conversation.

CANON 44, SECTION 1

OF REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE LAITY

Section 1. A communicant in good standing removing from one parish or congregation to another shall be entitled to receive and shall procure from the Rector or Minister of the parish or congregation of his or her last residence, or if there be no Rector or Minster, from one of the Wardens, a certificate stating that he or she is duly registered or enrolled as communicant in the parish or congregation from which he or she desires to be transferred and the Rector or Minister or Warden of the parish or congregation to which such communicant may remove, shall enroll him or her as a communicant when such certificate is presented, or, on failure to procure such certificate through no fault of such communicant, upon other evidence of his or her being such a communicant sufficient in the judgment of the Rector or Minister. Notice of such enrollment in such parish or congregation to which such communicant shall have removed, shall be sent by the Rector or the Minister thereof to the Rector of the parish from which the communicant is removed.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS, CONVENTION OF 1942

FIRST DAY

Kinston, N. C., May 13, 1942.

The Fifty-ninth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of East Carolina met in St. Mary's Church, Kinston, N. C., Wednesday, May, 13, 1942.

At 7:30 A. M. the Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Charles E. Williams, the Rev. W. R. Noe and the Rev. George F. Hill.

At 10:00 A. M. the Convention met for organization and was opened with the creed and prayers by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D.

The Secretary called the roll and 33 clergymen, 16 parishes and 3 missions responded as follows:

A quorum being present, the Convention re-elected the Rev. Walter R. Noe, Secretary.

The Rev. E. F. Moseley moved that the sessions be from 10:00 A. M. to 1:00 P. M.; from 2:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M. and that the evening service be held at eight o'clock. This was adopted.

The regular committees were appointed by the Bishop.
The Bishop nominated Mr. George B. Elliott as Chancellor of the Diocese and Rev. Stephen Gardner moved confirmation. Adopted.

The Bishop appointed committees to prepare suitable memorials on the death of Judge George Rountree and the Rev. Thomas L. Trott as follows; for Judge Rountree; Mr. W. A. Townes, Rev. Mortimer Glover, Mr. Thomas F. Darden, and Rev. R. I. Johnson. For Rev. Thomas L. Trott; Rev. Thomas P. Noe, Rev. E. W. Halleck and Mr. C. H. Huband.

The Bishop read a telegram of greetings from Mr. C. C. Chadbourn, a former layman of the diocese.

The Rev. Stephen Gardner offered the following resolution which was adopted:

WHEREAS, today is the 50th Anniversary of the erection of the Diocese of Southern Virginia and that Diocese is now in session in St. Paul's Church, Suffolk, Virginia,

BE IT RESOLVED, That a telegram of fraternal greetings and congratulations be sent to the Bishop and Council of the Diocese of Southern Virginia from the Bishop and Convention of the Diocese of East Carolina.

The Bishop appointed a nominating committee as follows: Rev. John W. Hardy; Mr. J. L. Butt; Mr. B. L. Meade.

On motion, the visiting clergy and candidates for Holy Orders were given seats in the Convention.

The Bishop read his Annual Address (See Appendix "A").

The Treasurer of the Diocese presented his report which was referred to the Department of Finance. (See Appenidx "B").

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The Rev. John C. Grainger read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

Since our last convention, our country has taken its place on the side of those who are determined to secure for all men the rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. We are now at war! This fact must necessarily underlie our report on the state of the Church in East Carolina.

Our loved ones have gone forth from their homes, their communities and their parishes to the far corners of the globe, ready and willing to sacrifice their very lives for a cause in which they believe. Countless thousands of other young men have poured into our diocese from all parts of the country, both for training and for the defense of our shores. Communities have changed. Homes have been broken. Valuable man power has been diverted. New jobs challenge our people. New problems have arisen for the churches.

Our diocesan office reports that there are now about 130,000 soldiers, sailors and marines stationed in East Carolina, with still other camps being constructed and thousands of soldiers still expected. These young men, many of them preparing to be sent to far flung battle lines, are counting on the people of East Carolina to make them feel at home. Many of them are counting on us in the Episcopal Church to afford them a place in the great family of the Church. They are in need of spiritual guidance, ghostly strength, companionship, kindness, friendliness. It is up to us to see that the challenge is met.

We feel sure that we should first commend those parishes who have been working at this problem now for a number of months. We would congratulate parishes in Fayetteville, Wilmington, New Bern, Elizabeth City, Beaufort, Lumberton, Clinton, Kinston, Greenville, Goldsboro, Southport, along the Inland Waterway, and elsewhere for the fine work which has been done for and with the soldiers, sailors, and marines. There are some places which have undertaken a tremendous job gladly and willingly, helping to give the men on leave real parish homes. This work is going to be tremendously increased and an even more vital piece of work is going to be necessary in many places in the days ahead.

By now you must know that it was reported at the meeting of the Army and Navy Commission on April 15th, that only \$200,000 had been received for the work of the Commission. It was estimated that about \$150,000 additional had been raised at that time, but not then reported. The Commission was

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then \$35,000 short of its original goal, and already that original budget had been necessarily increased since December. With very few exceptions East Carolina fell down in this task. Already the Commission has allowed us almost four times as much as we have raised for them. The offerings in most of our parishes were very inadequate, especially when we realize how much is being done for our own young men throughout the world and how much our work here in the diocese is going to be aided. This fact should be on our consciences as we go back to our parishes, a fact to be regretted, and a fact to be corrected. It is not by any means now too late.

Closely allied to this situation is the fact that our diocese is now overrun with defense workers, in vital industries and in construction work. In many ways the fact that some of our communities have doubled in size and others considerably increased presents an even greater problem than does the presence of the men in the armed forces. It is good to know that there is a commission on work in defense areas in connection with the National Council. Already we have been able to receive some financial help from this source in especially crowded areas, with further help undoubtedly to be tendered. This responsibility, too, must be shouldered by all of us, whether we are closely identified with such areas or not. These transient workers must be brought into our community life and must be made to feel at home in our parishes. It is up to us to minister to them.

No report of this kind would be complete without mention of the wonderful support accorded our Bishop by an active and interested group of East Carolina laymen. In November 1941 a small group met with the Bishop to talk over the needs of the diocese for 1942. These men represented almost every large parish and every section of the diocese. Through their enthusiastic efforts a considerable fund has been raised for the work of the Church in Jacksonville, along the Inland Waterway, and at other strategic points. It is gratifying to know that a Church building is soon to be constructed at Jacksonville, thanks partly to this group. Through these men also, the request was made that each parish increase its apportionment to the diocese by one-fourth. We understand that there has been a very good response to this request.

In speaking of financial matters we are glad to hear that during 1941 the response was considerably better than in recent years. Receipts in all the Churches for parish purposes amounted to \$100,802.15, an increase of \$4,617.26 over the year before. Receipts on apportionments for Diocesan and General Church purposes amounted to \$31,173.69, an increase of \$1,093.75 over

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last year. The diocese was able to meet its obligations in full, including payment of the General Church quota, and there was a reduction of \$821.36 in the diocesan debt. East Carolina also gave to British missions \$2,021.47, this sum representing a real contribution from some of the parishes, but a very lukewarm response on the part of others.

1941 was the first year of the Layman's Thank Offering, and the sum of \$1,010.26 was raised in the red Thank Offering boxes. This represents a very good beginning, although there are still many men who have not yet grasped the full significance of the offering as a spiritual privilege rather than a fund-raising device. It promises to be a very vital force and a substantial help in the work of the diocese in the future, and deserves our support.

It would be impossible at this time not to mention the wonderful leadership which the women have, as always, shown in East Carolina. It would be just as impossible to enumerate all of the work which they have done in the past year. Under consecrated and inspired leadership the Auxiliary has recognized the necessity for a greater emphasis upon the worship and educational features of our Diocesan Program and they have made every effort to extend and enrich the spiritual and intellectual life of the Church. The influence has been felt not only by the women of East Carolina but by every one in our diocesan family. The efficiency with which they have supported our missionary efforts, our adult conference at Camp Leach, our Youth Work, and many other worth while enterprises has been of great help and inspiration.

At this time it would seem imperative to comment on the fact that we live today in a very hectic corner of a very hectic world. Many of our men and women are being called upon for a multitude of tasks and for assistance in many fund raising campaigns. The Church must impress upon all of its congregations the importance of doing and giving all that they can, but of maintaining with this increased activity a proper perspective.

We must all remember that we are citizens of two communities and we must always let our allegiance to the kingdom of God underlie and enrich and empower the work which we do as citizens of an earthly state. At the same time we must also remember that our work in our communities and for our country gives evidence of the deeper allegiance which we have to God. We must strengthen and enrich the ties which bind us to God and to our Church, and then, strengthened by His might, we must show forth in our lives the fruits of the Spirit. Let us remind ourselves to discover our real talents and put those talents to use, making neither the mistake of shirking our re-

sponsibilities nor of overtaxing our abilities. In the confusion of life in most East Carolina communities we must avoid the mistake of attempting too much secular activity, but we must also avoid the fallacy of using our Church as a means of escape from the world in which we find ourselves.

From all reports the Forward in Service Program has been of great value in many places in the diocese. Most parishes recognize a need for an enrichment of the spiritual life of the individual members of the parish and of the congregation as a whole. The Roll Call suggestions and the subsequent emphasis upon prayer and worship were welcome and the materials which have been made available to us have in many instances proved very helpful. We are glad to hear of increased attendance at services, the formation of prayer groups and schools of prayer, the use of study courses on worship, attempts to revive the practices of family prayer and family worship, and many other attempts to strengthen both private and corporate experiences of communion with God. It is to be hoped that these efforts will continue.

The past year has brought, too, a deepening of the spiritual life of the clergy. Another pre-Lenten Clergy Retreat was held and the regular monthly meetings for prayer, study and meditation have continued. We must admit that we have sensed a slight decrease in interest in these monthly meetings, if attendance is any barometer. Our clergy need to come apart in these days for real fellowship and study. Insofar as is possible under present conditions we hope that an effort will be made to continue these meetings and to secure a larger percentage of attendance from the clergy.

Statistics released from our diocesan office reveal an astonishing fact in regard to the work which is now being done by our clergy. There are ninety-five places in which work is now being carried on. Only thirteen of these places are self sustaining. Although the rectors of these thirteen parishes have always proved their willingness to help in other fields when necessary, only one of the thirteen serves regularly any mission churches. The conclusion is obvious. Nineteen missionary clergymen and one rector have some eighty places in which to ninister. We must commend the consecration and patience of these overworked missionary clergy. It is interesting to note the substantial increase in confirmations this year. Our clergy presented fifty more than last year. All of us must do everything in our power to relieve them of a part of their load. The rectors of large parishes must be willing to assist whenever called upon, and the parishes themselves must be ready to

share their rectors with other places. This need is apt to grow even more urgent as the present conflict continues.

One of the most significant pieces of information revealed by the statistics of the diocese for last year is the fact that our Church School enrollments show a decrease of 55 members. This fact, coupled with the revelation of the report of the Temporary Youth Commission a year ago, shows us that our work with the children and young people of our diocese is not as strong as it should be. Had it not been for the great inflow of newcomers we feel sure that this decrease would have been even greater. Clergy and laity throughout the diocese reveal in their conversations a strange sense of inadequacy of the work being done for these young people. We cannot afford to let any sense of futility of such work creep into our observations. This is a dangerous possibility.

A year ago there were many signs of failure on the part of adults and clergy to grasp the full significance of work with young people, but there also appeared to be a very definite trend toward more persistent efforts to overcome our failure. Now, the increased pace of our secular activities, the opening of new fields of work, and the breaking up of homes and parish organizations, have all tended to make us surrender some of this growing enthusiasm. There are even some who would suggest that we turn our attention to other fields for the "duration".

We must never lose sight of the fact that these young people of today are the adults of tomorrow who are going to have on their hands the remaking of our world order. No amount of effort and sacrifice is too much in order that we might bring to them, now, the power to face tremendous problems later. Feeble excuses from adults about not knowing how to teach and to work with young people will not pardon us in the future. We shall make our mark in the world's history by the way we prepare youth today for the building of tomorrow. This job takes time, effort, study, patience, humor, tact, and hard work. But it is more than worth it. Indeed, our work with youth today is not a question of what it is worth to us. It is our responsibility to them and to the world.

We have to mention the great strides being made in our diocesan mission fields, especially along the Inland Waterway and in the Galilee Mission field, to mention only two. The consecration of our lay workers in many of these fields has been an inspiration. We would mention here the fact that these mission fields are building as they should build, with much emphasis upon their youth. Strong young people's groups mark many of our mission churches here and elsewhere.

Two particularly significant manifestations of the progress which is being made by our Negro clergy should be brought to our attention. During the past year, our colored congregations at both Sladesville and Farmville have begun their Church buildings. The work which they have done so far has been on their own. They deserve and need our support. We have always been proud of the Good Shepherd Hospital in New Bern, and it was welcome news to hear that there is a possibility that this fine hospital may be able to receive some help from our state and national Public Health Service. This Hospital has been so filled with patients that it was recently recommended by the Public Health Service that its capacity be doubled. is almost an accomplished fact that an appropriation for this enlargement will soon be approved. The work of the Hospital is considered of vital importance to the proper carrying out of defense work in the New Bern area.

By way of conclusion, we would emphasize the necessity for an ever-increasing sense of unity and fellowship in our Diocesan family. All of the problems and programs herein mentioned must be tackled by the whole family together, that we may be encouraged by knowing that there is unanimity of purpose and resolve, that no one parish or mission is shirking its share of the responsibility. When information is sent out from our National Council, our Diocesan Office, or from any committee or department in the Diocese, we must realize that such information is only completely effective if acted upon by the whole diocese. Too often in the past there have been a few who have made programs ineffective by the inadequacy of their response. Spiritually, educationally, financially, we must be able to know that East Carolina can enlist the support of every local Church community, if we are to be victorious in the tremendous job which faces us.

In our local communities, we are going to be thrown more and more on our own resources. Large gatherings, committee meetings, sectional get-togethers, and the like, are going to be very difficult and very scarce. Each individual church group is going to have to deepen its own corporate life, depending much more on its own efforts. If we are to preserve unity under such conditions, it will mean two things: the more prompt and effective use of the United States Mail, and the more sincere and effective remembrance of each other in our prayers. Such fellowship can help us do the jobs which others have hitherto done for us.

Over the wild restless sea of life, Jesus calls us in difficult times to march forward in His service. We as a Diocesan family have great tasks to accomplish in His name. May we discover that power which comes from real communion with God, and that unity which comes from real brotherhood of man, that we may answer the call of our Master and do our share towards the achievement of the ultimate victory of the Kingdom of God.

The Rev. John R. Tolar presented the report of the Department of Finance, which was approved, as follows:

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE

The Department of Finance begs to report that we closed the year 1941 with all bills paid including the full \$7,000.00 to the National Church and \$2,858.00 to the Thompson Orphanage. The income from parishes and missions was about \$1,000.00 more than in 1940. We would not have been able to meet our obligations on the income received had the Diocese been fully staffed as it must be this year if we are to do an adequate job. The Convention will realize the absolute necessity of filling fields now vacant if it will take into account that the population of the Diocese has increased from 700,000 to over a million. We must minister to these people and we need more men to do so. If the population has increased, a corresponding increase in receipts should be expected, provided we can man the fields and take advantage of our increased opportunities.

The budget for 1942 is based upon a 25 per cent increase in giving from all parishes and missions. This 25 per cent increase was recommended by the laymen of the Diocese in their meetings in both convocations and has been requested by the Bishop. It has been accepted by the great majority of the parishes and missions. Those who have not formally accepted the increase seem willing to make the effort to raise the amount by the end of the year. In dollars and cents the amount required to do the necesary work this year and the amount adopted by the Executive Council at its January meeting is \$40,823.00. The additional money is needed for aid to British Missions-\$1,500.00 now a part of the Diocesan Budget, and \$850.00 for the University of the South, also a part of the Budget; also for adjustment in salaries of the missionary clergy and for additional workers to fill the vacancies which now exist in the Diocese. The 25 per cent increase will not take care of this amount, but if we receive that increase, we will, with some special funds, be able to meet our obligations for this year.

For 1943 the Department recommends a Budget based on a 25 per cent increase from all parishes and missions over this year.

Report of Department of Finance

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This amount is necessary to meet a probable reduction in income from specials and investments which will not be available next year. The amount is not prohibitive being no more than that received from parishes and missions in 1930—the first year of the depression. Detailed apportionments under this schedule are shown below:

The report of the Church Pension Fund Committee of the Diocese was presented by the Rev. Walter R. Noe as follows:

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PENSION FUND COMMITTEE

As soon as possible after the meeting of the Convention last year, the New York office of The Church Pension Fund was notified of the action of the Convention.

In this notice, your Chairman stated that "While we have several months to prepare the way for any change that might be made, it is my desire to be relieved of the details as soon as possible".

The notice was acknowledged by Mr. Bradford B. Locke, Executive Vice-President. He said, "It seems to me that July 1st would be a good date to begin and I would therefore suggest that when you send out your June first statements you accompany them by a little note telling the parishes and missions that hereafter, beginning July 1st, the bills will come to them from this office and the payments should be made direct to this office."

When we sent out our June statements we enclosed the note suggested by Mr. Locke, and a statement showing unpaid assessments to the end of June 1941, with interest to that date. When the New York office sent out statements the 1st of July, a note was enclosed asking the parishes and missions to make the payments direct to the New York office.

Your Chairman has felt since that time that the New York office should be left as free as possible to renew its contacts with the parishes and missions and to use its own method for the collection of both arrearages and assessments.

We have offered from time to time to help the New York office and whenever we were asked to do so, have urged the parishes and missions to catch up in their payments.

The New York office has furnished us monthly statements and we have furnished to the New York office a great deal of information in regard to salary changes. We have also written letters almost every month to many of the parishes that were behind in their payments.

The latest report from the New York office shows that payments during 1941 were about as they were in 1940. Many of the parishes pay regularly but there are still a number that do not pay. As in 1940, one parish has failed to pay as much as six months of the year and this will affect the whole diocese.

With the help of your Committee we have been able to collect arrearages from a few of the places. One mission, which

has been behind for several years, has completed the payments and some of the others have made payments.

We have asked the New York office from time to time to see what might be done to collect these unpaid assessments and have offered to cooperate in every way.

Your Committee has made some progress in organizing the districts for any help that we might be asked by the National Office to give them in the collection of unpaid assessments.

Your Chairman feels that we have done everything we possibly could during the past year and that we have had the full cooperation of the National Office in this work.

The report of the Committee on Insurance was read by the Rev. Stephen Gardner, as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

Mr. Richard L. Meares, a member of the Committee for several years, has left the Diocese.

At a meeting of the Executive Council, in January of this year, the Bishop appointed Mr. Louie E. Woodbury, Jr., of Wilmington, a member of the Committee.

During the year the following additions have been made to the schedule policy of the Diocese:

- 1. St. Jude's, Aurora, increased from \$800.00 to \$2,000.00.
- 2. St. Mary's, Belhaven, on the Church building and contents, \$2,000.00; on the parish house and contents, \$2,000.00.

All claims have been promptly settled.

The insurance carried in the policy at the present time amounts to \$80,385.

One Church in the Diocese was almost completely destroyed by fire during the past year. It was not covered by the schedule policy, but was protected by insurance. A satisfactory adjustment was made and the building was restored, with additional improvements. Word has just been received of another fire, which again almost destroyed the building. It was again adequately protected by insurance, and we have every reason to believe that the building can be put back in good condition at an early date. The building was that of St. Philip-the-Apostle, Fayetteville.

Mr. Champion McD. Davis and other laymen spoke on the value of the special gifts now being raised for work at strategic points in the diocese.

The report of the Committee on the Diocesan Debt was read by Mr. Guy C. Harding as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE DIOCESAN DEBT

The work of your Committee during the past year has been largely in the nature of field work. From time to time the parishes and missions have been visited and the whole matter of the debt has been carefully explained to them. There has also been some correspondence on the subject with the parishes and missions.

Several parishes and missions have made payments during the past year and the total amount received since the meeting of the Convention, 1941, is \$821.36. The Treasurer's report shows that this has been applied on the debt.

Since we have been working to pay off the diocesan debt, fifteen parishes and missions have paid in full the amount apportioned to them. Thirty-six have made some payments and thirty-two no payments at all.

On account of the effort being made by the Bishop and others to raise funds for the regular support of the diocese and for special work, your Committee felt that it should wait until after this work is completed to present the matter of the unpaid apportionments to the parishes and missions that have not done their full part.

We feel that in the fall we can take up this work again with some hope of success.

The Rev. H. F. Kloman presented the report of St. Mary's School and Junior College as follows:

ANNUAL REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL, Incorporated

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Incorporation, the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith the report for the academic year 1941-1942.

Since the Diocesan Convention of 1941 there have been eight meetings of the Executive Committee and three meetings of the full Board of Trustees. At the called meeting of the Board on February 11, 1942, the Trustees adjourned after roll call, a quorum not being present.

Outstanding decisions reached at these meetings include:

First: Acceptance and approval of Reports of Saint Mary's Officers and Auditor.

Second: Continuous consideration of the advisability of a Centennial Celebration Drive and its administration, resulting in the decision that because of war conditions no intensive drive be held, but that voluntary donations be accepted through a Committee of Saint Mary's Trustees, Faculty and Officers, Alumnae and Friends, the total amount received to be used for the purchase of United States Defense Bonds—Results most gratifying.

Third: Support to the publication by the Alumnae of the book, "Life at Saint Mary's" as a Centennial Celebration feature—500 copies sold.

Fourth: Approval of \$750.00 General Charge to New Students for the 1942-43 Session.

Fifth: Approval of improvement of College Avenue, the North Boundary of St. Mary's Campus, to include concrete side walk, curb and gutter and hard surface road. This work is well advanced but completion has been delayed on account of war conditions.

Sixth: Approval of allowance to members attending Trustees and Executive Committee meetings for travel and subsistence expenses.

Seventh: Acceptance of Memorial Window to Mr. Ernest Cruikshank placed in the west transcept of Chapel.

Eighth: Acceptance of Historical Marker placed on Hillsboro Street at end of walk to Smedes Hall.

Ninth: Invitation to the Bishop to transfer the 1942 Diocesan Convention from the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, to St. Mary's School, because of the unexpected opening of a Naval Aviation School at Chapel Hill and consequent crowding of living conditions.

During the year the following new members have been welcomed to the Board of Trustees:

Rev. E. F. Moseley of Kinston, Diocese of East Carolina

Rev. W. T. Young of Fayetteville, Diocese of East Carolina

Rev. A. B. Clarkson of Edgefield, Diocese Upper S. Carolina.

The 1941-1942 session has been most satisfactory, with a capacity enrollment of resident students: 227 registrations accepted and in addition 62 Day and Special Students. Total 289.

The resident students come from 17 states and from China, one. From North Carolina, 125; Virginia, 40; South Carolina, 13; Florida, 10; Georgia, 6; Tennessee, 5; Alabama, Maryland and New York, 4 each; Washington, D. C., 2; Kentucky, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, 3 each; and Delaware, Kansas, Massachusetts, New Jersey 1 each.

The Religious affiliations given by 227 Resident Students are: Episcopalian, 129; Presbyterian, 50; Methodist, 34; Baptist, 10; and 5 from four other denominations. During the present session 4 Resident Students have been baptized and 10 confirmed.

The Religious affiliations given by 58 Day Students are: Episcopalian, 23; Methodist, 12; Presbyterian, 9; and 5 from three other denominations.

As this report is written the applications of 188 Resident students have been accepted for the 1942-43 session, of whom 86 are coming to St. Mary's for the first time and 102 are returning students. We expect a capacity registration for the 101st session which opens in mid-September 1942.

A condensed, financial statement of Assets and Liabilities of Trustees' Funds from the Auditor's report for the Fiscal year ending June 30, 1941, is attached.

The Trustees record once more their grateful appreciation to the officers and faculty of St. Mary's School for another year of successful management and efficient instruction.

Report of the Good Shepherd Hospital was presented by the Rev. R. I. Johnson as follows:

REPORT ON GOOD SHEPHERD HOSPITAL NEW BERN, N. C.

Rt. Rev. Bishop, Members of the Annual Convention and Friends:

The Good Shepherd Hospital founded as an expression of Christian Charity and brotherhood by the Great Church in this Diocese which we love and serve, is now in its fourth year of operation. The need it was established to meet in some measure, it is meeting with increasing effectiveness and skill, thanks to the able people who administer its benefits with their professional skill and sacrificial spirit. Although the number of beds in this area for colored people needing hospitalization has considerably increased since we entered this field of service, yet the number, in comparison to the number of colored people in East Carolina, is sufficiently small for us to still think of pioneers. The 100 at Wilmington's ourselves as beds New Community Hospital and Bern's Good Shepherd one bed for every three thousand Carolina's 300,000 Negroes; that is in strictly Negro hospitals. In the face of all the good work being done in these institutions, how wretched would be our plight but for those white hospitals which still have beds for colored people. A special merit of Negro hospitals is that they are training Negro doctors and nurses to work out the physical redemption of their own people, which is their contribution with the help and encouragement of their friends in the physical redemption of all.

It is to be noted that in 1940 we treated 364 patients. In 1941 the number was 455. In 1940 we gave 3,508 free days of care; in 1941, 2,580. The per capita cost in 1940 was \$2.90; in 1941 \$2.60. For 1942 the cost is up 2c per capita or \$2.62. Income for 1941 as compared with 1940 was \$17,765.88, as compared with \$14,869.33. Operating expenses in 1940 were \$13,132.30; in 1941, \$14,743.56. The hiring of a whole time laboratory and X-Ray Technician has occassioned considerable outlay for additional equipment which however has greatly augmented the efficiency of our doctors and nurses, who are greatly pleased with this additional service.

Money in larger measure than ever before has come over the counter for the support of the work. Whereas in 1940 full-pay patients numbered 115, in 1941 they numbered 268 out of 455 patients treated. Additional support has been derived from the Duke Endowment, the City of New Bern, Craven and adjacent counties and 'Friends of the Good Shepherd Hospital', at home and afar. Supplies this year have been received from the Diocese of East Carolina and the Diocese of Connecticut. An inspiration in the work is the growing interest and friendship of the people of East Carolina as indicated by the generous contrbutions from branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in our own Diocese which include not only materials but also gifts of money. The occassional visits of the workers in the branches as well as visits of clergy are a constant encouragement in this work.

Dr. McGeachey of the County Health Department still holds the various clinics, venereal, maternity, tubercular, etc. in our out patient department which was furnished by the W. A. of East Carolina. An increased number of workers is now engaged in this work due to the intensified program incident to war activities. One of our colored doctors is active in this work in the person of Dr. H. W. Fisher, senior warden of St. Cyprian's Parish. Within the year past, Dr. Mumford, colored, has completely lost his health, and one white member of the staff, Dr. Ashford, has resigned. The staff now is composed of Drs. Duffey and Martin; Wadsworth and Fisher; Kafer and Mann who work in pairs as named. To these gentlemen of the medical profession we are deeply indebted not only for the magnificent skill

with which they do their work which gives prestige and public faith to our hospital, but also for the unfailing willingness and consecration with which they take care of the considerable charity load which will always be a part of our work, as we shall always want it to be, as long as there are people who need it.

These doctors under the chairmanship of the Rev. Mr. Williams constitute our local board. They have done much to keep things running smoothly. Their loyalty and patient understanding have been a great source of strength.

It would be difficult to describe how important it is that we have in our chairman of the Trustees such a man as the Rev. Mr. Noe. Especially during this last year, his far sight and wisdom have been invaluable. We have felt that very strongly especially during these recent months when we have been bringing to what we hope is a successful conclusion efforts to expand our physical equipment through federal aid. Just now the outlook is that we shall very soon begin the erection of a 25 bed addition with this aid to meet the ever growing needs of our multiplying population. Likewise, we are now in the process of incorporation to prepare us to better perform our tasks in the various relationships which will be involved.

Members of the Board of Directors as of now are Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D., Rev. W. R. Noe, Rev. C. E. Williams, Rev. Stephen Gardner, Rev. R. I. Johnson, Messrs. E. K. Bishop, Reginald Morriss, I. H. Smith, W. C. Chadwick, J. T. Barber Mrs. John D. Whitford and Mrs. R. N. Duffy.

One could not wish a wiser counsellor and friend than our beloved Bishop whose keen interest in every detail of the work is most helpful. For him we thank God, take new courage, and trust to go forward.

The doing of the work which is entrusted to me in connection with the Good Shepherd Hospital is a joyful experience. The hours of each day are filled with the contemplation of the Power of God through the Church touching with healing efficacy the bleeding wounds of the world and giving to them that suffer "beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for the spirit of heaviness that he might be glorified". The number is no longer scores; it is thousands who rise up to bless the name of the Church through whose ministries the Lord walks again among his people.



BISHOP'S ADDRESS



BISHOP'S ADDRESS

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of East Carolina:

"Grace be unto you, and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ."

Twenty-five years ago at the annual meeting of our Diocesan Convention, held in Christ Church, Elizabeth City, I began my address with these words:—Once more we come together to give an account of our stewardship during the past year, and with earnest hearts and minds to plan for the greater and sterner tasks that lie ahead of us."

That address was delivered just a few weeks after our country had entered upon the first world war, and it was indeed a time of stress and strain and solemn responsibility.

The brave words of our great President, Woodrow Wilson, were still ringing in our hearts. "The task we are setting ourselves to is a great one, but the issue cannot be in doubt. To such a task we can dedicate our lives and our fortunes. Everything we are and everything we have—with pride of those who know that the day has come when America is privileged to spend her blood and her might for the principles which gave her birth and happiness, and the peace she has treasured. God helping her, she can do no other.

A year later when the armies of America were in mightly conflict upon the fields of France and Belgium, I said in my annual address:

"To the eyes of sense, the horizon offers nothing but darkness, confusion, the straining of mighty armies, the flash of guns and the sight of blood and smoke. The eyes of faith pierce the grim picture and see the purpose of God fulfilled; the Kingdom of God advancing. Have we the faith to see and understand, and answer "the morning cometh?"

Little did we realize when those words were spoken a quarter of a century ago that we would be facing a grimmer and more alarming picture today. Little did we reckon upon the power of hate and greed and national selfishness that would set the whole world on fire. In such a world, we meet today, not to take counsel of our fears, not to bow in defeat before the powers of evil that are battering against the defences of decency and order and security for the souls and bodies of men, but to plan for fuller cooperation with God in the carrying out of His plans for the redemption of the world.

Guided by His Holy Spirit, sustained by the consciousness that all power is given unto those who love and serve and follow Him, we will make this convention a high mount of conference with God, in order that we may learn of Him the only way to power, to victory, and to peace.

In that spirit, in that hope, I call you today to consider the King's business in parish and diocese and world.

In making my report on the state of the Church during the past year, I am thankful to state that we have gone forward in spite of unusual difficulties and problems, and that the Diocese as a whole was never more alert to its responsibilities nor more concious of its opportunities for service than it seems to be today.

Our confirmations in 1941 were much larger than in 1940 and our people's response to the call of the Church for the promotion of its mission work in diocese and world was greater than in several years.

Our work for and among the nearly four hundred thousand negroes of East Carolina, while totally inadequate on account of lack of Clergymen, Lay Workers, buildings and funds, has continued to go forward under the leadership of our small staff of Missionary Clergy, and in every place where the Church is functioning, standards of Christian character, clean living, loyal devotion to Christ's way of life are being maintained. It is earnestly hoped that through the sympathetic and generous interest of our more privileged people, both white and colored, we may be enabled to erect sadly needed Chapels for our promising Missions in Farmville and Sladesville at the earliest possible moment.

In several of our Negro Churches, notably St. Joseph's, Fayetteville, and St. Mark's, Wilmington, a real effort is being made to minister to the negro soldiers quartered at Fort Bragg and Camp Davis.

The Good Shepherd Hospital in New Bern has more than justified its establishment, as it continues with increasing usefulness to minister to the sick and injured people of a constantly expanding area. So great are the demands now made upon its limited facilities that it will be necessary with Government aid and approval, to double its capacity in the near future.

Under the able direction of our Executive Secretary, Rev. Walter R. Noe, who is carrying far too heavy a burden for one pair of shoulders, our Inland Water Way women workers, Miss McMurray and Miss Odell, are expanding their field of service from day to day and bringing new life and hope to many dwellers in isolated spots where the Church had never entered.

In addition to the Pioneer Mission, St. Andrew's, Calabash, where we have an attractive Chapel and a home for the workers, and St. Philip's Mission, Tar Landing, where we have a lot purchased by the people of the community, but no Church building as yet, regular services, Bible classes and young people's meetings are being held in Thomasboro, Gausey's Landing, Sea Side and Hickman's Cross Roads. Also a weekly Bible Class at Little River, S. C. All of the Inland Waterway Missions, with the exception of Tar Landing, are in Brunswick County, but our services are sadly needed in many other places along the Waterway from South Carolina to Virginia.

Keenly and gratefully conscious of the generous interest of the laymen of the Diocese as shown in the increasing response to the Laymen's Thank Offering and the Special Gifts Fund, it is my purpose to ask that a special effort be made to increase the L. T. O. Fund to an amount that will enable us to take care of the present Inland Waterway work and be enabled to secure additional

workers and open new Missions at strategic points during the coming year.

With such an objective and responsibility, I am satisfied that we will be able to enlist many more of our fine laymen in this worthy enterprise for Christ and His Church.

The regular work in our aided parishes and missions has gone forward remarkably well considering our serious shortage of Clergy. Regular services, although in many cases only once a month, have been maintained in every Church and Mission in the Diocese. This has been made possible by the loyal interest and devotion of our Missionary and Parish Clergy who have responded so cheerfully to the present emergency. I deem it fitting to mention the names of some of these men who, by their tireless zeal and energy, are making it possible for us to minister to all of our people during this period when the services of the Church are so sadly needed.

The Rev. Jack R. Rountree is serving six Churches in four counties.

The Rev. B. Wood Gaither is serving seven Churches in three counties.

The Rev. Sidney Matthews is serving five Churches in three counties.

The Rev. W. R. Noe, in addition to his duties as Executive Secretary, Treasurer and acting Archdeacon of the Inland Waterway Missions, has assumed responsibility for providing regular services in five vacant parishes and missions.

The Rev. John S. Armfield, although Rector of an important parish, is giving regular services to two colored Missions and three vacant parishes.

The Rev. Lewis F. Schenck, in addition to his four Churches in Bertie County, is giving regular monthly services to a vacant Church in an adjoining county.

Time would fail me to tell of the "Gideons and Baraks" among the other Clergy of the Diocese who in defense areas and near our great army forts and camps and bases

are making notable contributions to the cause of Christ in this dangerous, glorious hour of opportunity.

With our great increase in population, due to the fact that our rural Diocese has become an armed camp and defense industry area, our need for more Clergymen, more buildings, more funds has become urgent, and at whatever cost or personal sacrifice, we must meet this challenging opportunity which God has laid before us.

You will be happy to know that many of our people are not unmindful of the need, and that there has been quick and generous response whenever and wherever the need has been adequately presented.

In fact, one of the high lights of my ministry during the past twenty-five years was a conference that I held with eighteen laymen of the Diocese on November fourteenth, nineteen hundred and forty-one, at which time I presented the needs and opportunities of the Diocese and received the cordial and earnest support of those present.

As a result of that meeting, the Special Gifts Fund was established and I was given unofficial assurance that I might expect twelve or fifteen thousand dollars toward the erection of Church buildings at Jacksonville and at other strategic points in the Diocese.

While the goal has not been reached as yet, we have received more than four thousand dollars from interested members of the Diocese in sums ranging from one dollar to eight hundred dollars. We are prepared, therefore, to begin the erection of a combination parish house and home for the minister in Jacksonville immediately, and if funds are available, and the necessary permission can be secured, we hope to begin the erection of the Church this summer.

The Army and Navy Commission and the Committee of the National Council on Work in Industrial Defense Areas, having made a personal survey of the situation in East Carolina, have expressed their willingness, when funds are available, to make it possible for us to have a full time Clergyman at Jacksonville, a Lay worker in

Fayetteville and a woman worker for special duty in the Wilmington defense area.

We appreciate this thoughtful and generous consideration and shall be profoundly grateful for any assistance that may be rendered but we of East Carolina must realize as never before our own responsibility as sharers with God in His plans for the extension of His Kingdom and the strengthening of His cause within our borders.

We must give, with utter confidence in His guidance and complete surrender to His will, ourselves, our means, our thoughts and our prayers to the accomplishment of His purpose for our lives and our world.

We are honored to report that four of our Clergy are in war service.

Rev. Bartholomew F. Huske, D. D. who served as Chaplain in the Navy during the first world war, has returned to duty and is serving as Chaplain of the Naval Hospital in Portsmouth, Va.

Rev. Worth Wicker is serving as Chaplain and Captain of a Battery in the 113th Field Artillery, Fort Jackson, S. C.

Rev. William H. R. Jackson is serving as Chaplain of the 120th Infantry at Fort Jackson.

Rev. Oscar E. Holder is serving as Chaplain in the 6th Regiment, Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

Other of our Clergy are ready and willing to go when needed.

Hundreds of our boys are serving in the armed forces on land and sea and in the air.

In the words of my dear friend, the Rev. Frank Hall of St. Louis; "Our hearts are with the young men who have been called into the service of our country in the armed forces. We feel within ourselves somewhat unworthy of them. The sacrifice they render is so great, the dangers they face so real, the work they do so significant that our part in the struggle appears neglible.

What can we do for these young men thrust so rudely into destiny? Their heroism must be matched by heroism at home. These men must not give them-

selves in vain. They must not spend their best for a delusion. It is theirs to defend America. It is ours to make her worthy of their defense."

We must as individuals, as members of Christ's Body, the Church, as citizens of a nation built upon the eternal foundations of justice, truth and righteousness, come back to God and learn of Him how to make a better world, for it is profoundly true that "a secure and decent world cannot be achieved without God."

Freedom can only be found through Christ. Victory can only be won by the way of the Cross.

Brave General MacArthur, a member of this Church of ours, said recently, "It is my humble belief that the religion which Christ came to establish is based upon sacrifice; and that men and women who follow in His train are called to the defense of certain priceless principles even at the cost of their own lives."

Jesus said: "If any man will be my disciple, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow after Me".

Are we big enough and brave enough to hear and heed that call today?

Our sons and our brothers are enduring their Gethsemanes and facing their Calvaries for us and for the peace of the world. Are we willing to rise from our littleness, our worldliness, our spiritual poverty to the heights of sacrificial service in the fellowship of Christ, the Martyr, the Victor and the King who alone can make us worthy of our heritage as sons of God, who alone can enable us to build a world in which our children and our children's children may find abiding peace.

Almighty and most merciful God who alone can bring peace to a warring world, we beseech Thee to drive from the hearts of men the hatreds that destroy reason, and the greed that blinds the vision of Thy purpose.

Grant unto us the wisdom to know. and the courage to do Thy will in this high hour of dangerous opportunity, so that we may be enabled to share with Thee in the fulfillment of Thy plans for the redemption of the world, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

APPENDIX "C"

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA

Right Reverend Father in God:

The Woman's Auxiliary respectfully report their work for 1941 to you and to the Diocesan Convention. Instead of having it take the form of a condensed report written by the President, I wish it could be the full and complete reports of the two Convocational Presidents, just as they were prepared for the annual auxiliary meeting. They are reports that tell of the fine spirit and loving service which is evident in many places throughout our Diocese. This year shows a steady deepening of responsibility to the auxiliary work and a more comprehending knowledge of the program of the whole church.

The Diocesan Auxiliary Program was planned to follow, step by step, the Forward in Service Plan and we hope that in so doing the auxiliary has been instrumental in assisting the clergy in accomplishing satisfactory re-Youth Sunday with special services was urged sults. in September. Emphasis was made to use "Our Parish in Action" in October. Participation in the Church-wide Day of Prayer was requested in November and during Advent season it was announced that the Clergy would have special sermons on the meaning of Corporate Worship. Material was sent for Programs on Worship in our Auxiliary Packet for auxiliary use, also a book review on "Christian Roots of Democracy in America" was scheduled for Advent. The Mission study course, "Christians and the World Order" was undertaken in December and continued in January. In February, Quiet Day and Schools of Prayer were urged to be held throughout the diocese. Material for the dominant theme for Lent, Personal

Work and Prayer and Discipline, was sent as part of the Auxiliary Packet. Dr. Angus Dun's book, "Not by Bread Alone" was studied in many of our Auxiliaries throughout Lent. In April our Auxiliaries were urged to assist their clergy in the Post-Lent Roll Call. Also the Educational Department offered programs on a return to the devoted use and discipline of the Prayer Book.

From the above you can see that the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese has made a concerted effort to carry out the Forward in Service Plan as set down by our Presiding Bishop.

Taking up the departments separately I beg to call to your attention the following:

Christian Education—Reports from many parishes show marked improvement in quality and quantity of work. The greatest advance has been a coming into the current of thought from the National Department. This has been caused by an earnest effort to use the material from triennial convention. Some of this material has been adapted to the use of small weak branches and sent out in our own Auxiliary Packets. It has also been coordinated for regular use by our manual for carrying out the Church's program, which we call the diocesan program. men seem to have a more lively appetite for all this ma-There is improvement in understanding of the organization of the Auxiliary and of the location, character and purpose of 281 Fourth Avenue. Also the women have a greater willingness to serve and go forward. Mrs. Donald MacRae's term expired in January and Miss Hennie Long, Greenville was appointed Secretary of Christian Education for the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. We ask the Clergy for their cooperation in her work.

Supply Work—The Supply department in the diocese has done \$488.73 worth more work in 1941 than in 1940, with a great interest being shown both in filling allotments and in contributing new and used clothing and supplies to missions and the Good Shepherd Hospital within

diocesan boundaries. The response to the request for funds for 1940 unfilled allotments, the first such appeal the Diocese has ever received, was gratifying. Twenty-five out of twenty-nine allotments to St. Antipas Mission, Bemidji, Minnesota were accompanied by large boxes of second-hand clothing. Interest in the annual Lenten sewing Project for the Good Shepherd Hospital, New Bern, N. C., has grown in its three short years until two-thirds of the Auxiliaries in the Diocese take part in it. These facts fill us with gratitude, for they show an increasing interest in the missionary work of the church, and lead us to believe that the womanhood of the Diocese will continue to rally to its call, and also to the call of the Red Cross and all other relief agencies, finding time for both these Christian enterprises.

Christian Social Relations—The women of the diocese are cooperating in social welfare agencies, working for the Red Cross, Bundles for Britian, etc. Material has been sent out about the Refugees, and other war relief agencies. 48 auxiliaries have contributed to the Thompson Orphanage (State). Programs were held on Christian Needs, Migrants, Welfare Work in the Community, Thompson Orphanage, Good Shepherd Hospital, and Woman's Auxiliary Packet. \$2,236.45 has been spent for food, clothing, house rent, visits to county homes, jails, the sick and the needy. 2,571 used garments have been given to needy persons and to church missions. cooperation with all war relief agencies has been shown and auxiliary women have served as hostesses at U.S.O. Centers and assisted in providing wholesome recreation for our boys in camps.

United Thank Offering—Every parish in this diocese has given at both Spring and Fall Offerings, making the record for the diocese 100 per cent in participation. One mission reports fifteen women in the parish, with twenty-three women having blue boxes, and twenty-three sharing in the offering. The total offering for the year

was \$4,113.41, a gain over 1940 of \$487.86, and is the largest offering we have ever had in one year.

Promotional Department. This department has tried 1. What is meant by Promotion in the to emphasize: Church. 2. Who participates in this promotion. 3. What do we promote. 4. How do we promote. The fourth question of HOW was presented at both Convocational meetings, reaching at least 300 women. The method used for demonstration was that of a large bulletin board displaying the following: Triennial Packet of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary Program, Forward Day by Day, Pointers, Our Parish in Action, Educational Reporter, The Broadcast, Visual Educational Folder, Map Folder, Forth Family, Forth, Diocesan Magazine, and Young People's Diocesan Magazine. An explanatory talk on the value and place of each of the publications accompanied the demonstration and several parish Auxiliaries are promoting and using a similar News Bul-Each Auxiliary in the diocese received letin Board. monthly, except during the summer, "The Church in Action", "Forth Family", and during October, Every Member Canvass material including the November issue There is decidedly a growing knowledge of of Forth. the whole Program of the Church.

Missions and Church Extension—The Missions of the Church (both in the Foreign and Domestic Field) have been kept before the women continuously. There are talks on some of these missions at all District, Convocational, and Annual Meetings, and through the Speaker's Bureau of the Diocesan Auxiliary, we have brought a number of missionary speakers to the diocese. Some of these have spoken in the large parishes, but many of them in the small parishes. This plan was inaugurated in 1940 and at the Annual Meeting in January 1941, it was interesting to note that the parishes who had had the missionary speakers were the first to ask for them this year. Our annual Apportionment always includes missions in

the diocese, in the nation, and in the world. Articles are prepared on these particular fields, and every auxiliary has copies for program material. Different fields are taken each year. We have had many talks on Christian Unity and articles on the subject have been sent all auxiliaries for program material. We always try to emphasize the fact that the real missionary spirit will come only from individuals who have grown spiritually, through meditation, prayer, and Bible study as well as through knowledge of the Church's Program. We have tried this year particularly to emphasize the fact that it is necessary that we have a broader and more sympathetic understanding of Missions of the future, that a new world order is upon us and we must prepare ourselves to meet it.

General—More auxiliaries reported observance of the World Day of Prayer and the Churchwide Day of Prayer. Even with the number of calls today from war relief agencies, the women have done more work than ever before and have also given both time and money to many humanitarian efforts. There has been a very small increase in members, 44. The women are apportioned \$2,400 as their budget for the year. They gave (in actual money) to the five fields of service, \$16,216.84. This does include the United Thank Offering, and means voluntary gifts amounting to \$13,816.24.

With a year of strain and trouble the Women of the diocese do thank God for the increasing opportunities to serve and do pray for His Love, Guidance, and Light to show them the part they may take in bringing about world peace.

"I am sorry that I have found it unwise to undertake any services for the last year and indeed, except for two or three services at St. James' Church, for several years. I hope the financial needs are being met in these difficult and lean years

when every other obligation is usurping the place of the mission of the Church. My regards to the Bishop. I hope he is in robust health once more and that he will conserve his strength within his powers."

REV. EUGENE deF. HEALD, Hickory, N. C.

"Under stress of writing difficulty I respectfully submit my canonical report. Since my last report of 1940, I have been serving various parishes in North Carolina and Western North Carolina dioceses, chiefly St. Martin's, Charlotte—a very gratifying tenure of seven months and the Church of the Holy Comforter, same City, which I am serving at present during the critical illness of the Rector."

REV. J. B. BROWN, Washington, N. C.

"I celebrated Holy Communion at St. Paul's Church, Washington, N. C., for Rev. C. M. Johnson while he was away. Assisted in two burial services at St. Paul's Church. I have a Bible Class in St. Paul's. I have been holding Friday night services at St. Paul's Church for Rev. C. M. Johnson. Twelve services at the State Prison Institution about two miles from Washington. The Rev. Mr. Gardner asked me to go for him on three third Sundays at the State Prison Institution and two Sundays for the Rev. Mr. Everett at the State Prison.

I was called to Rich Square, N. C., February 8, 1942, to officiate at the burial of the wife of Dr. H. A. Parrish, and I have attended all Civic meetings held in Washington, 1941.

I am retired; but I find there is always something that I can do, and do it willingly.

REV. THOMAS P. NOE, 510 Market Street, Wilmington, N. C.

As the time of Convention draws near, I am submitting, through the Secretary of the Diocese, a summary of my activities for 1941, for your information and record, though practically all the statistical information is contained in the reports of the several parishes and missions where I have had an opportunty to serve.

The first month, January, I was still finishing my work for the Church Home Orphanage and my work there was not finally completed until the Convention of that Diocese, Upper South Carolina, after which I was formally transferred to the Diocese of East Carolina.

During the Lenten season I aided the Secretary in caring for

the congregations at St. John's and Good Shepherd, while they were without the services of rectors; and I had three baptismal services, eight confirmation addresses, presented two classes for confirmation and took part in four funerals, conducting 75 regular services and 25 celebrations of the Holy Communion. In addition to these services and pastoral visits I had two celebrations and three other services for Mr. St. Amand; four services for St. Stephen's, Goldsboro; one celebration and two morning services for St. Andrew's, Wrightsville; 4 services and four celebrations at St. Mark's, Wilmington; one celebration and four other services at St. Philip's, Southport; 3 services at St. Mary's, Burgaw; one service at Jacksonville and two at St. James' Church, Wilmington and one service at Carolina Beach.

I attended the Auxiliary meeting at Jacksonville, the opening service at St. Thomas, Bath and went to the Synod in Charleston. I also did quite a bit of visiting.

I received \$100 from St. John's, Wilmington; \$150 from Good Shepherd; \$30 from St. Mark's; \$40 from St. Stephen's; \$2 from Mr. Malone and the Offerings from Jacksonville and Carolina Beach, which was enough to pay for gas. I estimate the other expenses for travel at about \$100, making a net receipt of \$220 for service.

In addition to these services in the congregations, I have taken part in the work of the Examining Chaplains, serving with Mr. Miller and Mr. Halleck and I also presented one candidate for the Priesthood.

It has been good to be back in my native Diocese after an absence in South Carolina of nearly twenty three years, where I served very happily among a very appreciative body of Christian brethren; and I am ready to continue such services as are available, under the limitations of my retirement status; and it has been a genuine pleasure to be back and join in the services of the Diocese of East Carolina; and with God's blessing, I hope to render much more service during the time that remains. 



EXTRACTS FROM CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

CANON 43

OF THE DUE CELEBRATION OF SUNDAYS

All persons within this church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, by regular participation in the public worship of the Church, by hearing the Word of God read and taught, and by other acts of devotion and works of charity, using all godly and sober conversation.

CANON 44, SECTION 1

OF REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE LAITY

Section 1. A communicant in good standing removing from one parish or congregation to another shall be entitled to receive and shall procure from the Rector or Minister of the parish or congregation of his or her last residence, or if there be no Rector or Minster, from one of the Wardens, a certificate stating that he or she is duly registered or enrolled as communicant in the parish or congregation from which he or she desires to be transferred and the Rector or Minister or Warden of the parish or congregation to which such communicant may remove, shall enroll him or her as a communicant when such certificate is presented, or, on failure to procure such certificate through no fault of such communicant, upon other evidence of his or her being such a communicant sufficient in the judgment of the Rector or Minister. Notice of such enrollment in such parish or congregation to which such communicant shall have removed, shall be sent by the Rector or the Minister thereof to the Rector of the parish from which the communicant is removed.

Beaufort, St. Paul's; Belhaven, St. James'; Bonnerton, St. John's; Clinton, St. Paul's; Edenton, St. Paul's; Elizabeth City, Christ Church; Fayetteville, St. John's; Fayetteville, St. Joseph's; Goldsboro, St. Stephen's; Greenville, St. Paul's; Kinston, St. Mary's; New Bern Christ Church; Plymouth, Grace Church; Southport, St. Philip's; Washington, St. Peter's; Wilmington, St. James'; Wilmington, St. John's; Wilmington, St. Paul's; Wilmington, Good Shepherd; Windsor, St. Thomas; Winton, St. John's; Ahoskie, St. Thomas'; Belhaven, St. Mary's; Fayetteville, St. Philip's; Sunbury, St. Peter's; Wilmington, St. Luke's.

A quorum being present, the Convention re-elected the Rev. Walter R. Noe, Secretary.

The Rev. Walter R. Noe moved that the sessions be from 10:00 A. M. to 1:00 P. M., and from 2:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M., and this was adopted.

The regular committees were appointed by the Bishop. The Bishop nominated Mr. George B. Elliott as Chancellor of the Diocese and the Rev. Jack R. Rountree moved confirmation. Adopted.

The Bishop appointed committees to prepare suitable memorials for the Journal as follows: For Mr. George C. Royall, Rev. John C. Grainger and Mr. B. L. Meade. For Rev. Eugene deF. Heald, Rev. Alexander Miller and Mr. William B. Campbell. For Mr. Thomas F. Darden, Rev. E. W. Halleck and Mr. H. F. Wilder. For Mr. Guy C. Harding, Rev. Stephen Gardner and Mr. John G. Bragaw. For Mr. J. V. Grainger, Rev. Mortimer Glover and Mr. George B. Elliott. For Mr. E. R. Conger, Rev. Lewis F. Schenck and Mr. D. M. Warren.

The Treasurer of the Diocese presented his report Which was referred to the Department of Finance. (See Appendix "B".)

It was announced that the Rev. Duncan M. Gray was being consecrated Bishop of the Diocese of Mississippi and the Secretary was directed to send a suitable message.

In appointing the Rev. Robert I. Johnson as Archdeacon of the colored work in the Diocese of East Carolina, the Bishop said:

"It gives me much pleasure to appoint as Archdeacon of the Colored work in the Diocese of East Carolina, the Rev. Robert I. Johnson, who, by his zeal, energy and consecrated devotion to the cause of Christ and His Church, has won the confidence and esteem of the clergy and people not only in his own Diocese, but in the Province and National Church as well.

Archdeacon Johnson will continue to serve as Rector of St. Cyprian's Church, New Bern, and Superintendent of the Good Shepherd Hospital, but in addition to those duties, will assist the Bishop in strengthening our present missionary work and establishing new missions in strategic points.

His present cordial relations with his brother clergy of the Colored Convocation will not be affected by his new title, as he will be working with and for them and not as a Director of their activities.

We believe that this new plan will make for real growth and harmonious development of our Colored work."

The appointment was unanimously approved by the Convention.

On motion, the visiting clergy and candidates for Holy Orders were given seats in the Convention.

The Bishop presented the statistical part of his Address. (See Appendix "A".)

The report of the Finance Department was read by the Rev. John R. Tolar, Chairman of the Department.

REPORT OF FINANCE DEPARTMENT TO ANNUAL CONVENTION

This is to be a short Convention with a lot to be accomplished within a very limited time. The report of the Department of Finance will therefore be short and to the point. I can summarize what I have to say in a brief sentence; the parishes and missions did better than they did the previous year but they did not do enough. Our receipts were \$1,241.00 short of accepted apportionments and \$1,519.00 short of budgeted needs. In addition to this, we were able to make no reduction in the Diocesan debt which still remains \$11,683.00. The details of failure to meet budgeted needs follows:

British Missions:

Amount budgeted, \$1500.00. Paid \$981.20, deficit \$519.00. This item was an important part of the program of the General Church. We accepted \$1500.00 as our goal of endeavor. The Church counted on it to complete its budget. It should have been paid.

University of the South

\$850.00 budgeted, paid \$400.00 — deficit \$450.00. We promised the amount budgeted and the school was handicapped in its work by the amount we failed to pay. This institution is partly owned by the Diocese. It trains our priests — the future leaders of the Church than which there is no more important work.

Bishop's Salary

Canonical \$6000.00; paid last year \$5400.00, deficit \$600.00. This has been for several years one of the sore spots — one of the injustices of our financial set-up. We specifically pledged ourselves last Convention to correct this. We failed to do so by \$600.00. The Bishop feels the high cost of living as the rest of us do. In add tion, his illness this year, from which we hope he is recovering, must have entailed a considerable additional expense. This item of our budget cannot remain in its present condition. It is a primary obligation.

Our Diocesan debt of \$11,683.00 continues as a great handicap in the prosecution of our work, not only because of the large interest item involved every year which should go into the active work of the Diocese, but also because our Trust funds are impaired by that amount. Efforts to pay off this debt by special subscriptions have failed. The debt must be funded and a certain amount set aside every year until the entire amount is liquidated.

In addition to the above, we have not, as a diocese, been able to meet opportunities to advance our work which have been presented to us. We have, in spite of a shortage of clergy, kept all of our places opened with at least occasional services, but no funds are available to fill vacant fields, nor to meet numerous ealls for new workers, buildings and equipment to take care of people who have come to places where we have no organized work at the present time. This is a situation that we cannot continue to ignore. We need more money for work with our armed forces.

What is the answer to all this? There is only one answer. At our last Convention we accepted as a goal of endeavor for this year, a budget based on a 25 per cent increase of apportionments over 1942. The details as they would apply to the several parishes and missions appear in the Journal of the 1942 Convention, which you all have. Your department not only recommends, it urges that this be adopted by this Convention as the budget needs for this year and that we all go back to our several fields of work accepting these needs as our obligation and make an earnest effort to reach them. We can do no less.

In addition to the items budgeted for this year, we recommend that the Bishop, starting with June first, be paid his full canonical salary. That \$2000.00 be set aside as a payment on our debt and that any increase in our receipts for this year over \$38,000 be shared in proper proportion with the General Church.

Your department realizes that all of us are bothered with in-

creased living costs, with higher taxes, with withholding taxes, with the legitimate demands that we purchase war bonds, and with numerous other drives which are necessary for the successful prosecution of our war effort. All these necessary things must continue, but surely, as we render unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's, we cannot neglect to render unto God the things which are God's. In these days some things must be subordinated, but surely the Church is not one of them. It is a priority, equally important with the priority of Government, for it is the program of the Church which must win a peace which would create a new world of justice, righteousness and lasting peace. If such a world is to come, if we are not having to go through all this again, we must strengthen the Church, make Her strong and vigorous that Her voice may be heard. Our future happiness, the happiness of our sons and daughters and of generations yet unborn depends upon this. Let us resolve to do our part!

- 2: "That \$2,000.00 be set aside as a payment on our debt." This was adopted with the understanding that it would be done, if possible.
- 3: "That any increase in our receipts for this year over \$38,-000.00 be shared in proper proportion with the General Church." Adopted.
- 4: "At our last Convention, we accepted as a goal of endeavor for this year, a budget based on a 25 per cent increase of apportionments over 1942. The details as they would apply to the several parishes and missions appear in the Journal of the 1942 Convention, which you all have. Your Department not only recommends, it urges, that this be adopted by the Convention as the budget for this year and that we all go back to our several fields of work accepting these needs as our obligation and make an earnest effort to reach them. We can do no less."

After much discussion the recommendation was adopted, with the understanding that the Finance Department would have power to make necessary adjustments and that parishes and

missions that had not sent in their 1943 reports, do so within sixty days.

The Bishop appointed a nominating committee as follows: Rev. Alexander Miller and Mr. J. R. Butt.

On motion of the Rev. Lewis F. Schenck, the election of deputies to the General Convention was made the order of the day following noon-day prayers.

The order of the day having been reached, the Rev. George F. Hill and Mr. Montrose Hinnant were appointed tellers for the election of clerical deputies to the General Convention and the following were elected:

Clerical Deputies to the General Convention: Rev. Walter R. Noe, Wilmington, Rev. Mortimer Glover, Wilmington; Rev. Stephen Gardner, Washington; Rev. Lewis F. Schenck, Edenton.

Alternate Clerical Deputies: Rev. John C. Grainger, Goldsboro; Rev. E. F. Moseley, Kinston; Rev. Jack R. Rountree, Kinston; Rev. E. W. Halleck, Wilmington.

Rev. E. F. Moseley and Mr. Richard Smith were appointed tellers for the election of lay deputies to the General Convention and the following were elected:

Lay Deputies: George B. Elliott, Wilmington; Robert Strange, Wilmington; J. A. Moore, Edenton; C. McD. Davis, Wilmington.

Alternate Lay Deputies: Junius D. Grimes, Washington; W. B. Campbell, Wilmington; John Haywood Jones, New Bern; Dr. H. W. Fisher, New Bern.

The Rev. Stephen Gardner presented the report of the Committee on Insurance as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

Since the last report, three thousand dollars (\$3000.00) worth of insurance has been added to the Schedule Policy of the Diocese, making the total sum now carried in the policy, \$83,385.00.

There has been no damage by fire to property covered by the Schedule Policy during the past year.

The fifty-ninth Annual Convention of the Diocese, meeting in St. Mary's Church, Kinston, N. C., Wednesday, May 13th, 1942, elected the following to be members of the Standing Committee for the ensuing year:

The Rev. Jack R. Rountree, The Rev. Stephen Gardner, The Rev. Charles E. Williams, Mr. William Dunn, Mr. Guy C. Harding.

Upon call of the retiring president a meeting of the Standing Committee was held in the Parish House of Christ Church, New Bern, N. C., for the purpose of organization. Upon the nomination of the Rev. Jack R. Rountree, the Rev. Charles E. Williams was elected President. On the motion of Mr. Guy C. Harding, the Rev. Stephen Gardner was elected Vice President of the Committee. On motion of the Rev. Stephen Gardner, Mr. Guy Harding was elected Secretary.

Six meetings of your Committee were held during the Convention year.

Consent of the Standing Committee was given to the election of the Rev. Oliver James Hart, D.D., L.L.D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Pennsylvania.

Consent of the Committee was given to the election of the Rev. John Moore Walker, D.D., to be Bishop of the Diocese of Atlanta.

Consent of the Standing Committee was given to the election of the Rev. Wiley P.oy Mason, D.D., to be Suffragan Bishop of Virginia.

Consent of the Committee was given to the election of Rev. Herman R. Page to be Bishop of the Diocese of Northern Michigan.

John Hare Bonner was recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Diaconate.

The application of Cecil L. Alligood to be admitted a Candidate for Holy Orders was approved and he was recommended to the Bishop.

The Rev. William Bell Daniels was recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese for Ordination to the Sacred Priesthood.

Consent of the Standing Committee was given to the election of the Rev. Duncan Montgomery Gray to be Bishop of the Diocese of Mississippi.

Our committee has sustained a great loss in the passing of

one of our members, Mr. Guy C. Harding. We feel keenly his death and realize to the full that both the Committee and the diocese at large has lost a most valued friend, a wise counsellor, and an alert worker in the vine-yard of our blessed Lord. May God give peace and rest to his soul.

At an organized meeting of the Standing Committee the members elected Mr. John G. Bragaw to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Harding.

The Standing Committee also noted with deep sorrow the passing of Mr. E. R. Conger who was a former member of this Committee for many years. Suitable resolutions were sent the families.

March 24, Mr. William Bell Daniels, Jr., Candidate for Holy Orders, completed in a satisfactory manner the subjects required for Deacon's Orders under Canon 4, Section 2.

September 24, Mr. Cecil L. Alligood, Postulant, desiring to be admitted a Candidate for Holy Orders, presented evidence of four years work at the University of the South, and two years work at the University of North Carolina, this evidence together with examinations conducted by the Examining Chaplains completed to their satisfaction the requirements under Canon 2, Section 5, Sub-section 2.

November 3, Mr. John H. Bonner, Jr., Candidate for Holy Orders, completed in a satisfactory manner the subjects required for Deacons Orders under Canon 4, Section 2.

The above examinations were held in Wilmington with The Rev. E. W. Halleck, The Rev. Thomas P. Noe, The Rev. Alexander Miller, Examiners. All reports and recommendations were presented to the Bishop of the Diocese in the order and form required by the Canons.

The Rev. Lewis F. Schenck read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

In keeping with a "streamlined" Convention the Report of the Committee on the State of the Church will be as "streamlined" as possible. This does not mean that the work of the Church in our Diocese the past year has been streamlined in the sense that we use the word in regard to this Convention, which is "shortened" or "cut to a minimum." The Church in East Carolina has met the challenge of a changing world in war times by holding high the Standards of Christ and fighting manfully under His Banner against the world, the flesh, and the devil. At home and on the far flung battle lines of the world this Diocese is making a noteworthy contribution toward the preservation for posterity of those ideals and principles which are the fruit of Christianity.

Ten of our clergy, almost a third of the active clergy in the Diocese, have entered the service as Chaplains in the Army and Navy. Every Parish and Mission has contributed large quotas of its youth, men and women, to the service of the nation. The Sunday Schools, Young People's organizations, and Camp Leach have made a worthy contribution to the war effort by the noble type of citizenship captured at many Altars, group meetings, and camp fires. Our prayers ascend on high for them at every Sanctuary in the Diocese. May God go with them to bless, preserve, and keep them for the greater task of preserving the peace at the end of the war.

Although the absence of Clergy and young people who have entered the service of our country has made a deep impression in our ranks, the camp and industrial defense communities have brought an overwhelming number of strangers within our gates. With the rapid development of the section of the state of North Carolina which comprises our Diocese into an Arsenal of National Defense our Church has kept pace in its development as an Arsenal of Faith.

Among the Parishes especially cited for work in this respect are St. Stephen's Church at Goldsboro, the Rev. John C. Grainger, Rector; Christ Church, Elizabeth City, the Rev. George F. Hill, Rector; St. John's, Wilmington, the Rev. E. W. Halleck, Rector; Christ Church, New Bern, the Rev. Charles E. Williams, Rector; St. James', Wilmington, the Rev. Mortimer Glover, Rector; and St. John's, Fayetteville, temporarily without a Rector.

The former rectory at St. Stephen's, Goldsboro, has been fur-

nished as a service men's lounge and home and is thus maintained. The Parish House at Elizabeth City has been supplied with games and reading material for service men where social gatherings for the men and their families are held. The upper floor of the Parish House at New Bern has been made into a comfortable recreation room for men in uniform. Refreshments are served from time to time. At Wilmington where, it is said, the population has almost trebled, Episcopalians are working with other religious bodies in providing services and church schools. Fellowship suppers are held monthly by the Young People's Service League at St. John's for soldiers, sailors, and marines. Regular Sunday evening meetings are featured by special programs and refreshments.

Mrs. W. O. S. Sutherland is employed as the worker in the industrial defense area around Wilmington. The church is doing a notable work through her competent help. By her contact men and women are being brought to church and children to Church School. Thus lives are enriched by fellowship with Christian men and women and the Saviour of the World.

Great work among Negro service men is being accomplished by such men as the Rev. L. C. Dade, Rector of St. Mark's Church, Wilmington, which is near Camp Davis with its many Negro soldiers; the Rev. R. I. Johnson, Rector of St. Cyprian's Church at New Bern which is near the Negro Marine Camp at New River; and the Rev. J. S. Braithwaite, Rector of St. Joseph's, Fayetteville, which is near Fort Bragg with its thousands of Negro troops.

The Army-Navy Commission of the Church has been most helpful to us, giving more than \$10,000.00 during the past year. This includes \$4,000.00 on the church building at Jacksonville and \$2,400.00 for the services of a clergyman. The Diocese has just asked for \$10,000.00 more for next year, beginning May 1st, 1943. This aid challenges every parish and mission to the wholehearted support of this fund.

A very bright spot in the report of this committee is the response of the laymen to the work of the church in those parishes and missions whose clergy have answered the call of their country. In many cases the work goes forward under lay readers with enthusiasm and competence. Some of the officers and men at Camp Davis and the New River Marine Base were layreaders in their own dioceses and they have been of untold help in holding services in our diocese.

Several churches are particularly noteworthy for the work be-

ing carried on by lay readers. More than passing mention should be made of the lay readers activities at the Church of the Advent, Williamston; Grace Church, Whiteville; and the churches at Wrightsville Sound, Jacksonville, Carolina Beach, and Lumberton. Before the Rev. John Hardy left Williamston for the service he trained several excellent lay readers who are continuing regular services and making a notable contribution to the work of the church in that community. Six laymen have been licensed at Whiteville, and services are being held every Sunday by a young lay reader at Lumberton. As more of our clergy enter the service more of the work of the Diocese will rest upon consecrated lay workers.

Nor can we omit, in a section on the challenge of the parishes who have no rectors, commendation to overworked clergy in their own parishes who are administering the Sacraments and serving in other ways those parishes and mission without benefit of clergy. Mention, too, should be made of the beautiful spirit of the congregations which so willingly share their clergy with such parishes and missions.

While the church in East Carolina has risen to meet so nobly the challenge presented by the changing scene wrought by the war with its defense and industrial activities, in many other respects the past year will go down on the pages of history as one of progress.

The present number of clergy in the Diocese is 46. In spite of the great number who have left the diocese temporarily as Chaplains, this is a larger number than we have had for some years. Although some of them are retired and non-parochial this does not alter the number. The future of the church was brightened by the ordination of two priests and two deacons in 1942. The Bishop reports 316 confirmations of whom 63 were colored. Comparatively speaking, this is four less than the past year. The parishes and missions paid on their apportionments approximately \$5,000.00 more than in the previous year. There was also a corresponding increase in the income from parishes and missions for their own work.

Two new church buildings are being provided for our people: one at Tar Landing near Camp Davis, and one at Jacksonville near the New River Marine Base. The building at Tar Landing is nearly completed and is now in use. The one at Jacksonville will be completed in a few weeks. It was used for services on Easter Day. The building of these two churches was greatly aided by the laymen of the diocese through the medium of the

Laymen's Thank Offering and special gifts. It seems proper to add here that the Laymen's Thank Offering has great possibilities and will be of immense value to the Bishop when the parishes and missions as a whole take an interest in it. The laymen of the Diocese at both the Convention of 1941 and the Convention of 1942 offered to raise a special fund of \$20,000.00 for work in Camp Communities, Industrial Defense Areas, and the Inland Waterway, as well as other places where there is need. More than \$7,000.00 has already been raised and, when this fund is completed, it will enable the Bishop to take care of the needs which are now pressing.

No report on the State of the Church is complete without mention of the notable work of the Inland Waterway Mission, the Good Shepherd Hospital at New Bern, Camp Leach, and the Galilee Mission on Lake Phelps.

In addition to the pioneer mission of the Inland Waterway, St. Andrew's, Calabash, where we have an attractive chapel and home for the workers, and St. Philip's Mission, Tar Landing, where a church building is nearing completion, regular services, church school, young people's meetings are being held at Thom-Side, and Hickman's Cross asboro, Gausey's Landing, Sea All of these places are in Brunswick County with the exception of Tar Landing. Our program calls for work out of centers for about fifty communities along the Inland Waterway where no religious bodies are working at the present time. With clergymen stationed at points like Southport, Beaufort, Wrightsv.lle Sound, and Jacksonville, we can easily serve a large number of people. Our Diocesan Secretary, The Rev. W. R. Noe, is correct when he says "This work is just as romantic as work in Alaska." It can not help catching the imagination of our people when it is fully presented to them. The people of the general church have become interested in this work. The testimony of this fact is the request for articles about the work by the church press, including Forth. While this work is under the very able direction of our Diocesan Secretary, we can not mention this work without speaking in words of reverence and praise the names of those two consecrated handmaidens of the Lord - Misses Jettie Odell and Elizabeth McMurray. These two faithful laborers in the Lord's vineyard are bringing to the isolated the new life and hope and courage which only the Church can impart.

The Good Shepherd Hospital in New Bern has more than justified its establishment. As the years since its establishment increase, this institution increases in service and value. Today it is

making real progress. A wing is being erected by the government in order to take care of the many people who need the services of a hospital. The hospital is not altogether self-sustaining, but with the aid of Church people generally and government agencies, it has been operated for some time now with all its obligations paid.

Dear to the hearts of all our young people and those who have been young people the past number of years is Camp Leach. Mention of its far reaching influences in the world conflict was made at the beginning of this report. It has been of equal value in developing and training leaders for work in the parishes and missions of the Diocese. The accomplishments of this camp challenge the support of every parish and mission to keep this property in good condition and to aid it in every way possible, financial and otherwise.

In ecclesiastical, none the less than in secular circles, names make history. It would be amiss not to mention with words of commendation the names of our consecrated women workers who are giving their full time to the Diocese. We have already spoken of the work of Misses Jettie Odell and Elizabeth McMurray in connection with the Inland Waterway Mission, as well as Mrs. W. O. S. Sutherland, worker in the Industrial defense Area in and around Wilmington. The story of the excellent work at Galilee Mission on Lake Phelps is the story of the enthusiastic and consecrated endeavor of Miss Lona Bell Weatherly. No report on the State of the Church is ever complete without reference to the consecrated efforts of Miss Anna Louise Robertson who at the present time is at Christ Chapel in Kinston. A new worker in the Diocese the past year, but one who in so short a time has won the admiration of many in her work with the men at Seymour Johnson Field at Goldsboro, is Mrs. Nelson Goucher of St. Stephen's Church.

No report of this kind is ever complete without reference with grateful hearts to the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. To enumerate their activities would mean incorporating into this report the proceedings of their Annual Meeting which convened at St. Peter's Church, Washington, in January. Suffice it to say here that they are in all departments "The Good Man Friday" of the church. Under consecrated and inspired leadership they have made great strides toward the enrichment of the spiritual life of the Diocese, as well as contributing so generously in material ways to the forward march of the Church.

Mention should also be made of the great contribution to the Church by several colored women workers, viz: Ethel Bernard,

who operates a Nursery School in the Brooklyn Section of Wilmington; and the wives of the Rev. S. N. Griffith and the Rev. J. B. Brown who operate parochial schools in Edenton and Washington respectively.

It is with sadness in our hearts that we recall the disability of our beloved Bishop. Every Parish and Mission feels keenly the absence of his inspiring and strengthening presence in the past few months. However we rejoice that he is still at the helm of the Church in East Carolina giving general oversight to the work of the Diocese. All places with Confirmation Classes ready have had the services of a visiting Bishop.

In conclusion it is with grateful hearts that we recount the accomplishments of the Diocese the past year. This does not mean that these accomplishments are such that we can rest upon them with self-satisfied complacency. Quite to the contrary. Our work the past year is of true value only to the extent that it is an incentive to higher goals of achievement for Christ's Kingdom.

In view of the increased demand being made upon this Diocese by an ever increasing number of Soldiers, Sailors, Marines, and Industrial Defense workers, this Committee recommends the wholehearted support of every Parish and Mission by generous countributions to the Army-Navy Commission, the enthusiastic support of the Laymen's Thank Offering, and increased donations through apportionments and special gifts to meet these increasing demands. It recommends, too, the co-operation of laymen in defense areas, and in parishes and missions temporarily without clergymen that the church doors may be kept open and the work of Christ's Kingdom go forward. The Committee further recommends the attendance of as many of our people as possible at summer conference leadership courses that we might be better equipped for the great task ahead for the Church.

We cannot close this report without stressing the importance of the deepening of our spiritual lives. The Office of Instruction informs us that our duty as Church members is "to follow Christ, to worship God every Sunday in His Church; and to work and pray and give for the spread of His kingdom." Therefore, as St. Paul says, "Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold upon eternal life whereunto thou hast also been called and hast professed a good profession before many witnesses."

Reports on the work of the laymen of the Diocese were presented by Mr. Robert Strange and Mr. W. G. Gaither.

Resolutions respecting the illness and subject of the recovery of Bishop Darst were offered as follows:

RESOLUTIONS OF THE DIOCESAN CONVENTION 1943 RESPECTING THE ILLNESS AND THE SUBJECT OF THE RECOVERY OF THE RT. REV. THOS. C. DARST

WHEREAS, the Convention of the Diocese of East Carolina, in annual meeting assembled at Greenville, North Carolina, on this 12th day of May, 1943, has noted with great satisfaction the progress of recovery of the Rt. Rev. Thos. C. Darst, and is thankful for the substantial improvement which has occurred in the state of his health and

WHEREAS, the Convention hereby expresses its desire that he be afforded every opportunity for complete recovery and full restoration to normal health and strength; and

WHEREAS, the Convention expresses the hope that Bishop Darst will feel free to release himself from the duties of his office to the extent that he may deem it desirable so to do to enable him to have ample time for rest and complete recovery, and particularly that he feel free to use the summer season from June to October for that purpose.

NOW, THEREF()RE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Convention of the Diocese of East Carolina, in meeting assembled at Greenville, North Carolina, on this 12th day of May, 1943, as follows:

- 1. That the Convention is highly pleased to note the improvement which has occurred in the state of health of the beloved Bishop of East Carolina, the Rt. Rev. Thos. C. Darst, and the progress he has made toward recovery.
- 2. The Convention hereby expresses the hope that Bishop Darst will feel free to take such time as he deems desirable and necessary to become fully restored to normal health and strength, and that he will also feel free to release himself from such duties of his office as he may deem desirable and necessary in order for him to have a full season in which to attain complete recovery, and that Bishop Darst will use the season of June 1 to October 1 for said purpose.

The foregoing resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Convention in meeting assembled as aforesaid.

The Bishop spoke of his hope of being able to return to his work in the fall but thought it might be well for an advisory committee to be appointed as follows: Mr. George B. Elliott; Rev. C. E. Williams; Mr. J. A. Moore; Rev. John R. Tolar and Rev. Alexander Miller.

The Rev. Messrs. E. F. Moseley and John C. Grainger presented some plans for the conference at Camp Leach.

The report of the Trustees of the Diocese was presented by Mr. Richard S. Rogers. (See Appendix "D").

The report of The Church Pension Fund Committee of the Diocese was presented by the Rev. Walter R. Noe, as follows:

THE CHURCH PENSION FUND

"Each year it has been found helpful to send to the proper Diocesan official a letter summarizing some of the points in connection with the administration of The Church Pension Fund which might prove interesting to the Conventions of the various Dioceses and Missicnary Districts. This letter is for that purpose.

The first item of interesting information is in regard to the pensions payable by the Fund. The present total of the roll of beneficiaries amounts to almost \$1,400,000 a year, which is about 35 per cent. in excess of what the total would have been if the Trustees had not been able to expand benefits beyond the original promises of the plan.

Although the interest situation is still a difficult one on account of low interest yields on high grade investments, it is the hope of the Trustees that they will be able to continue the program of expanding the benefits of the Fund for future beneficiaries. This interest situation is not the result of defaults in interest. The Church Pension Fund has been extremely fortunate in this respect and the present market value of its investments is substantially in excess of their cost and their book value.

There is enclosed herewith a list of the pensions which the Fund is now paying to beneficiaries in East Carolina, amounting to a total of \$9,397 a year. It is interesting to note that the total pension assessments payable in East Carolina amount to approximately \$5,500 a year. Taking the Fund as a whole, the total pension roll, as noted above, is about \$1,400,000 whereas

the total pension assessments payable each year to the Fund amount to a little more than \$1,000,000. a year.

So far as the pension assessments are concerned, the record continues to be extraordinary. They are running at the rate of over \$1,000,000. a year and the current arrears are lower than they have ever been in the history of the Fund. Even so far as overdue arrears for previous years are concerned, their total now is only about \$45,000. Relating this figure to total pension assessments of over \$25,000,000. which have actually been paid to the Fund since its inception, you will see that the assessment system has operated with practically 100 per cent effectiveness throughout the Church for the last 26 years.

The present assets of The Church Pension Fund amount to approximately \$36,000,000. They exceed the total liabilities by what is considered to be a safe margin, thus maintaining the Fund upon a sound financial basis and justifying, we believe, the confidence which the Church has in the plan and administration of The Church Pension Fund.

The Church has, through a Special Report which was sent to all of the clergy, the parish treasurers and the other officials, already been advised of the action taken by the Trustees at a Special Meeting in May, 1942, resulting in a more conservative program in respect to the extra benefits of the Fund, over and above those guaranteed in the original Rules. That report also included the announcement of an amendment to the formula controlling the Disability Allowance for clergymen ordained since March 1, 1917, in order to correct certain inequities which were developing under the previous formula. Both of these actions appear to have been accepted and approved by the Church in general.

As you know, The Church Pension Fund has three wholly-owned subsidiaries, namely The Church Hymnal Corporation, The Church Life Insurance Corporation and The Church Properties Fire Insurance Corporation, all of which are in excellent financial condition and performing a useful function for the Church, as well as being profitable investments for The Church Pension Fund. Without interfering to any appreciable extent with secular organizations of a similar nature, the scope of their activities is gradually growing and, by combining their cost of administration with that of The Church Pension Fund, they not only enable the Fund to operate on a more economical basis, but also make it possible for them to offer their facilities at a lower cost than would otherwise be the case.

The above is a brief summary of certain facts which I believe may be of interest. Although stated in general terms, I would be very glad to supply you with any additional information which you may desire at any time.

In sending you this letter, I should like to take this opportunity of again expressing, in behalf of the Trustees of the Fund, our deepest appreciation to you and to others for the assistance given to us in administering the affairs of the Fund. The Church Pension Fund could not continue on a sound basis without the confidence and support of the entire Church. The Trustees are convinced that it could not have reached its present stage of successful development without the assistance of the Pension Fund Committees and other interested individuals in the various Dioceses and Missionary Districts whose cooperation has been invaluable to us.

The Secretary presented the report of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution as follows:

Report on Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution

REPORT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION

To the Members of the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage:

1943

It is my extreme pleasure to report to the Board at this meeting the accomplishments of the best year the Orphanage has had for some time. We should feel very proud of the progress that has been made during the past year and of the fine future that lies before us. The Orphanage has never been in better condition and I believe has the confidence not only of the Church but of the people of the State in a way that it has never had before. Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant have done a splendid job in building up and improving the Orphanage in every phase of its work. This improvemnt and development has not only been in the material field but in the character building and spiritual sphere as well. Those who have been on the Executive Committee and the Board as well, have but to think back to see the improvement that has been made. This is no reflection in the least upon any previous management of the Orphanage but is to be accounted for by reason of the fact that the Orphanage had reached a crisis where it needed to be re-vitalized, you might say, and Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant were fine selections as Directors and Managers in bringing about this result. So, I repeat that our institution is in excellent condition and I am pleased that the excellence of our institution is not only appreciated by the members of our church but also by the public generally as has been recently shown by their willingness to contribute so generously to the Thompson Orphanage. Now, without making a long report, I wish to point out briefly the progress that has been made along several lines.

First: Repairs to the cottages and buildings. During the year we have spent the sum of \$2,695.14 in permanent improvements and repairs on our various buildings. All this money for these repairs coming out of our current fund except about \$300.00 which was taken from the building fund. The larger items of this expense were as follows: Furnace, \$789.61; farm, \$206.13; Laundry, \$197.29; so during the year the buildings have been put in good state of repair and are in the best condition they have been for some time.

Second: Buying a herd of cattle, building a barn, and purchasing farm equipment. During the first part of the year we had secured enough funds from sale of Orphanage property to build

a barn, but we had no cows to put in it, which was a rather fatal weakness. One of our good Methodist brethren, Mr. George Dowdy, became interested in the Orphanage and, when this situation was explained to him by Mr. Whisnant, he stated that he was going to raise the funds to buy this herd of cows. He held a lunch meeting with a selected group present, some of whom were Episcopalians, and some not, and distributed cards to this group. Under his direction, we all became active and were told it would take at least \$4000.00 to purchase a herd of cows. Under Mr. Dowdy's skillful and enthusiastic management, this barn fund finally amounted to \$4,170.00. As a result eight fine Jersey cows were purchased from the Morrison farm and we now have eight cows and four calves, which is a very valuable herd for the Orphanage. The cows are of the finest breed and are saving us much money in purchasing milk and butter and at the same time giving us much finer milk and butter than we probably could purchase. In addition, a \$1,000.00 tractor has been given to the Orphanage, thanks to Mr. M. E. Pierson, Frank M. Shannonhouse, Ralph Bouligney, and Fritz Seifert, President of the Hudson Silk Hosiery M.lls, who is a Lutheran. These gentlemen purchased the tractor and gave it to the Orphanage, which is, of course, very essential both in producing food for the cows and also for general farm work. In connection with the operation of the dairy and farm, an ensilage cutter has also been purchased for \$375.00, a sterilizer for \$275.00, and we still have in our cattle fund the sum of \$1,022.22, which can be used for any real needy purpose in connection with the dairy or farm. the building of the barn and the purchasing of the herd and the receipt of the necessary machinery to make the operation of the dairy a success is a notable contribution to the efficient and economic operation of the Orphanage.

Revolving Fund: Some of us have thought for some years that we should avoid borrowing money at the bank if it is possible for us to do so. As you know, it has been necessary for us to start, say about the first of September, and borrow some money from the bank each year to carry us through until receipt of the Thanksgiving Offering. This we have been doing and have always wiped the slate clean by paying all indebtedness on receipt of the Thanksgiving Offering, but this has necessarily handicapped us throughout the year. This year, for instance, we borrowed only \$4,500.00, which has been already paid back out of the Thanksgiving Offering. Some of us have felt that if we could get a revolving fund from which the Orphanage could borrow and pay itself back all current funds on receipt of the

Thanksgiving Offering, it would be a much healthier condition financially. With this in mind, we got up a letter, which I had the pleasure of drafting, setting forth this desire on our part, to raise the revolving fund and giving the needs for same, which letter was written, not to Episcopalians alone, but to many members of other denominations. The letter was framed so as not to be an appeal to anyone because he or she was a member of the Episcopal Church. I am glad to report that so far we have received from this letter in round numbers about \$2,500.00 which has come from different parts of the state, and I feel that before the year is over we will receive many more contributions to this fund. The appeal was made so that if the gift could not be made during 1942, it might be made during 1943.

Special Gifts: In addition to the contributions above mentioned, we have received \$1,395.06 in special gifts during the year which is higher than we have received for some time.

Thanksgiving Offering: We are gratified to report that our Thanksgiving Offering was \$2,200.00 larger than last year which, of course, is very encouraging and should help us operate this year without borrowing money from any source. The success of the campaign was due largely to the work done by Mrs. Francis Clarkson, Chairman of the Publicity Committee and the fine help she received through the Orphanage office under the direction of Mr. Whisnant.

So, from the standpoint of finances, we are in the best position we have been for a long time, and it is due in a large measure to the generosity that has been shown the Orphanage during the past year which I attribute to the renewed interest that not only our church but the public generally has taken in the Orphanage.

Now as to the character building features of the Orphanage program, I am satisfied that the improvement here has been just as marked as in the field of finance.

First, the children have been taught by Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant that the Orphanage is their home and that they must feel that it is such and they should make their contribution to make it a happy and beneficial one. In order to give them an opportunity to serve the Orphanage, at the same time helping to build their own characters, they have provided for the boys to work on the farm, in the dairy, and the general work in and around the whole Orphanage premises. It is most gratifying to visit the Orphanage from time to time and see just what fine work the boys are doing. Mr. Whisnant made a statement to the Executive Committee that he had already trained eleven milkers be-

fore he had received his herd of Jerseys. I suppose he trained them on the few scrubs he had before the purchase of the herd. As to the girls, they are given work in the laundry, do sewing and in the summer, canning. Mr. Whisnant says that one of the needs of the Orphanage at the present time is a first class canning unit.

Spiritual Development: The services are held by Mr. Wheeler at 8:15 every Sunday. The children either go to St. Peter's or St. Martin's Sunday School. Some go at 9:30 and some at 11:00. This is a very fine spiritual atmosphere and is just what must be kept around the Orphanage if it is to fulfill the original purpose of not only raising the children placed in the Orphanage but developing them as fine and moral Christian children.

We now have eighty-three children, forty-five girls and thirty-eight boys. At this time last year we had seventy children, thirty-one boys and thirty-nine girls, so we have increased thirteen during the past year. As you know we have felt that a total census of ninety was probably all that we should have in the Orphanage at one time although, of course, we could take care of one hundred if it became necessary. It is interesting to note that the average age of the children is getting younger. Whereas in 1941 we had ten children over eighteen, in 1942, we had three over eighteen, and 1943, no children as old as eighteen. The oldest children here are three boys and three girls, each seventeen years of age.

Personnel of the Orphanage: The Orphanage has now eighteen employees, including Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant, Mr. Whisnant's secretary, the general handy-man, the farmer, the cooks, the maid, which makes a total of eighteen with the matrons, which I consider not a large personnel for the operation of an institution which has to take care of upwards of ninety children. This is very much in line with the size of personnel of institutions of this type generally. May I say that the house matrons have done splendidly during the year and have rendered a fine service to the institution during 1942, and the services of all employees of the institution have been satisfactory.

This concludes my report. I wish to say again that we have had a most successful year and the Executive Committee is pleased to be able to report to the Board of Managers the improvement and development that has taken place in the Orphanage during the past year and which we feel confident will continue during 1943, as it is in excellent condition at the present time and is in splendid hands.

The Secretary presented the report of St. Mary's School and Junior College as follows:

ANNUAL REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF SAINT MARY'S SCHOOL, INC. OF RALEIGH, NORTH CAROLINA, 1943

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Incorporation, the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith the report for the academic year 1942-43.

Since the Diocesan Convention of 1942 the following meetings of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee have been officially held:

Annual meeting of the Board of Trustees on June 3, 1942, three Bishops, six Rectors and four Laymen in attendance. This gratifying attendance indicated approval of an annual meeting date following the confusion of Commencement week, allowing time for uninterrupted consideration of the important school matters presented.

Meetings of the Executive Committee, quorums present, on July 9, October 6, 1942 and March 31, 1943.

Among matters of importance considered in the above meetings are the following:

- 1. New members welcomed to the Board of Trustees: (a) Mrs. J. Cheshire Webb:- Diocese of North Carolina; (b) Mr. Stephen E. Burroughs:- Diocese of North Carolina; (c) Rev. G. Mark Jenkins:- Diocese of Western North Carolina.
- 2. Mrs. J. Cheshire Webb was elected a member of the Executive Committee.
- 3. The Rev. Henry F. Kloman retired as Chaplain, June 30, 1942, with the close of the fiscal year.
- 4. Mrs. Ernest Cruikshank, President of Saint Mary's School, completes her tenth year of service and is voted the commendation and appreciation of the Board for her achievement of the past decade.
- 5. Consideration and acceptance of reports of school executives and C. P. A. Auditor.
- 6. Election of the Rev. I. Harding Hughes as Chaplain of Saint Mary's School for the Fiscal Year.
- 7. Acceptance of the resignations from the Executive Committee of the Rev. I. Harding Hughes, who has become Chaplain of Saint Mary's School and of the Rev. W. Tate Young, who has entered the Government Service as Chaplain.
 - 8. Acceptance of bequest of Nannie Creecy Cahoon of Eliza-

beth City, North Carolina — interest in certain real estate to revert to Saint Mary's School, Inc.

- 9. The death of the Rev. Henry F. Kloman, August 29, 1942.
- 10. Acceptance of an Annuity Plan for Faculty and Officers through Trust Agreement with the New England Mutual Life Insurance Company which became effective December 1, 1942, with twenty-two members participating.
- 11. Approval of Faculty and Officers' contracts for the 1943-44 session.
- 12. Consideration of Government Regulations as affecting school policies under war conditions.
- 13. Retirement of A. W. Tucker after 22 years' service as Business Manager of Saint Mary's School to become effective at the end of the fiscal year, June 30th, 1943.

The 1942-43 session has been most satisfactory with a capacity enrollment of resident students—232 registrations accepted and in addition 55 Day and Special Students. Total 287.

The Resident Students come from sixteen states: from North Carolina 179; Virginia 43; South Carolina 12; Tennessee 10; Alabama and New York 7 each; Florida 5; District of Columbia and New Jersey 4 each; Kentucky, Pennsylvania, Georgia and West Virginia 3 each; Arkansas, Massachusetts and Connecticut one each.

The Religious affiliations given by 232 Resident Students are—Episcopalian 118; Methodist 51; Presbyterian 35; Baptist 17; and 5 from two other denominations, while 6 are not members of the church. During the present session 4 Resident Students have been baptized and 8 confirmed.

The Religious affiliations given by 46 Day Students are—Episcopalian 22; Methodist 9; Baptist and Presbyterian 4 each; 5 from three other denominations, while 2 are not members of the church.

As the report is written the applications of 184 Resident Students have been accepted for the 1943-44 session, of whom 87 are coming to Saint Mary's for the first time and 97 are returning students. A capacity registration for our 1943-44 session which opens in mid-September is assured.

War conditions have necessitated many changes during the present session but Saint Mary's has offered whole-hearted cooperation. Since last October our students have taken military drill under R. O. T. C. officers from State College, supervised by U. S. Army Officers. The courses have been expanded to meet Government regulations in the Commercial, Home Economics

and Art Departments. The Red Cross work has been featured, including First Aid and Life Saving Training. Regulations regarding — rationing of food; wages; blackouts; collection of Victory Tax, have been strictly enforced. During the recent "Second War Loan" drive, Faculty, Officers and Students purchased \$13,245.00 in Bonds and Stamps and generous subscriptions have been made by the students to the Red Cross, USO, Christmas Over-Sea Packages and other war activities.

A condensed financial statement of Assets and Liabilities of Trustee's Funds from the Auditor's report for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, is attached.

The Trustees hereby record their grateful appreciation to all the executive officers of the School for the faithfulness and efficiency with which they have discharged their several duties and responsibilities. We also express our regret over the termination of Mr. A. W. Tucker's connection with the School as the exceedingly competent Business Manager and loyal friend of St. Mary's.

During that period we have had nearly 2,000 in-patients and 500 out-patient emergencies, to whom we have given nearly 25,000 days of care at a cost of over \$70,000. This is the creative thing which our Church has done in bringing to people who need it more than anybody else in the country the Christian ministry of Healing. This is what has come to pass in an area where such was unknown before. Nor have we just had patients; we have done for these patients a work that has been declared to be outstanding. I heard one of our doctors say that the most interesting cases he has ever seen from the standpoints of medicine and surgery he has seen at the Good Shepherd. Our doctors have registered a high degree of success with difficult cases that would do credit to the great metropolitan medical centers of the country. This speaks eloquently for the fine men who serve us professionally. One of our white doctors resigned and one of the colored doctors lost his health. This leaves us three white and three colored men who are: Dr. Wadsworth, Dr. Duffey and Dr. Kafer; and Dr. Fisher, Dr. Mann, and Dr. Martin. We have five graduate nurses and an adequate complement of nurse aides, maids, and orderlies.

During the past year, the Federal Government realizing our fitness to be chosen for the task has begun an addition to our facilities that will give us 25 more beds. This addition which is costing around \$35,000 is well on the way to completion. Some eight weeks ago we were held up indefinitely by failure of the Priorities Board to give us priorities for plumbing, heating, and lighting. This interruption came just at the time that Mr. Noe, our chairman, was in the midst of his grave illness; and I who had been so long accustomed to his wise counsel was very much lost to know what to do. After long and painful effort and with the help of Congressman Barden, the Hospital Facilities Section finally approved us and recommended that the priorities be granted. This has been since Easter and I am happy to be able to report that work is now resumed. What I have just said em-

phasizes how fine has been Mr. Noe's leadership in matters concerning the Good Shepherd Hospital. And our prayer is that he may be spared for many a year to guide and direct the work. As great a help as anything has been our consciousness of the sympathy and encouragement of our beloved Bishop. The confidence he has reposed in us as we have striven by trial and error to learn how to perform this task, and the complete freedom he has given us in striving, and his patient tolerance have been both inspiration and strength.

The link between the board of directors and the administrative routine has been the group of doctors presided over by Mr. Williams, whose interest in us continues, but I imagine is sometimes baffled by the uncertainty of our doctors in these busy days when all seem to be overworked.

The nearness of Marine and Army installations in our area presents for the hospital an opportunity and a challenge and we pray that we may have the faith and vision needed for them.

If I should say to you that "Elizabeth has passed on" some of you would recall what we have called our most famous patient. Elizabeth was the child we used to talk about who was brought to the Good Shepherd, emaciated, sub-human in appearance and near unto death, who lived in the hospital for six months and was finally apparently restored to good health, adopted by a Church family, baptized at St. Cyprian's Church, and lived a few happy years that in some measure compensated her for the cruelty and neglect that had been the lot of her infancy. Her story was told all over the Church and along with her picture was spread all over the country as some of the first fruits of our Christian institution. Her little heart never recovered from the derangement her sufferings inflicted.

Bright of mind and winsome of manner she was widely known and greatly beloved, and passed away a few weeks ago. Her funeral at Good Shepherd Hospital was largely attended with a children's choir and acolytes.

Thirty-three years ago when I went to Belhaven there arrived the same month a young man, a graduate of St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, who opened up a tailor's shop and carried on his business for many years. A year ago, broken in mind and body, his resources gone, his health failed. In the days of his strength he was a valiant helper in the Church. It was a pleasure on the request of Bishop Darst to admit William Dawson on Dec. 6th to the Good Shepherd where he is happy in the midst of friends of his Church, where Mrs. Johnson takes him to Church

every Sunday and returns him to the hospital where he vents his joy to the patients for days afterwards.

Or I might tell you of James Gray, the husband of a devout churchwoman, Mrs. Mary Satterwhite Gray of Williamston. Mrs. Gray is the sister of Archdeacon Satterwhite of Florida, and is an educational supervisor in Martin county. In all the years James Gray had been a Methodist unimpressed by his wife's Churcn. After a severe stroke in which he could not receive the attention he needed because his wife had to leave him alone to do her work, Mrs. Gray was moved to bring her husband to the Good Shepherd. He has been there several months, is steadily improving and on the visit of Bishop Littell to St. Cyprian's Church, he was carried bodily into the Church and received the apostolic rite of confirmation bringing joy to the heart of his devoted wife and finding for himself a long desired peace and happiness.

The life of prayer at the Good Shepherd has a fame that has spread far and wide; for the Superintendent is also Chaplain and prays daily with all and none ever goes to the operating room without spiritual preparation. In the course of this work he has baptized a considerable number. Now all are beginning to know that the Good Shepherd is also a House of Prayer.

I mentioned above that we shall have 25 additional beds. This means additional help, more overhead, more of all the things we shall have to pay for, drugs, food, equipment. And that means that the good friends of the Good Shepherd Hospital who have stood by us in the past must continue with us as we trust they will. And the number must be augmented. The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of East Carolina gives to us increasingly year after year good supplies of linens and donations of money. Packages for the lenten work of 1943 are still coming in. May God increase the number of our friends. No one should think any gift too small to send. We can find a place for everything. There has been a considerable falling off of gifts from other parts of the country. A gentleman at Glen Loch, Pa., said to me one day, "You must look more and more to people in your part of the world who see and feel the fruits of your work to help you." And so, I fondly hope that more and more "Friends of the Good Shepherd Hospital" in my part of the world will bless us with their generosity and encouragement.

The Secretary presented a report on the work of our Church at the University of North Carolina as follows:

THE CHAPEL OF THE CROSS, CHAPEL HILL, N. C.

To the Convention of the Diocese of East Carolina:

Our report this year is more of a look to the future than a survey of the past. Chapel Hill, perhaps more than most communities in the state, has been radically changed by the war. All during the past year the civilian enrollment of the University has steadily declined. By June it will have reached its lowest level.

From June on it is expected that there will be about 1100 or 1200 civilian men students and 600 or 700 women students here. On the other hand the number of military students assigned to Chapel Hill is ever increasing. At present the Navy Pre-Flight School has stationed in the University buildings about 1900 men with 300 officers and their families living in the village. have their own Chaplain, but since he is a Congregationalist we do what we can for the Episcopal Cadets during their three month's sojourn in our midst. Two months ago the Army established a large Pre-Meteorological School here. The students are in uniform and under Army discipline, but all the instruction is done by University professors. Mr. Gribbin has been appointed a sort of civilian chaplain to the detachment. On July 1st the Navy will station enough men here to fill all but one of the remaining dorm tories and seventeen fraternity houses. This outfit will have no connection with the Pre-Flight Schol. will be taught by University professors, but they will not have a Chaplain of their own. The Church's opportunity for service will be greatly increased when these Naval trainees arrive. The civilian students that are expected to be here next year are female, 4Fs, under 13, or deferred because they are chemistry or physics majors. The medical students will continue their studies, but are expected to be in uniform by mid-summer.

In short, there will be more students here in Chapel Hill next year than this, but most of them will be in uniform. No chaplain other than the one in the Pre-Flight School is expected to be stationed here. The work of the Church, therefore, instead of declining is increasing. It is increasing in need, in opportunity, and in difficulty.

During the past year part of our program has been successful, part has not. The services have been well attended, but discussion groups and similar student gatherings have done very poorly. We have lost our organist and many members of the choir due

to the draft and premature graduation. Half the members of the Student Vestry left in March. And so it goes.

The authorities in the Pre-Flight School will not allow the Cadets to make their communions except once every two months. On other Sundays they are compelled to attend their Chaplain's services. No amount of persuasion or cajolery has been able to work out a more satisfactory arrangement. On the first Sunday of every other month the Cadets are marched over to the Church. We move the 11:00 o'clock service up to 10:30, omit the sermon, use short hymns, and get a retired priest to help us. All must be communicated and the service finished in a little more than an hour so that the cadets can make a 11:45 formation. One Sunday we had a hundred and forty-six cadets make their communions.

You might be interested in a few words about the work at other colleges in this diocese. Miss Margo Fletcher continues her effective work with the Episcopal girls at the Woman's College in Greensboro. St. Mary's House there has been an influence and a help to many. The situation at Duke University is similar to that here at Carolina in that several military units have been statined there. The Rev. H. N. Parsley, originally of Wilmington, is our full time missionary to the several hundred Episcopalians on that campus. The students at N. C. State now have a small chapel of their own located in the Y. M. C. A. building on the campus, and the work there has taken a new lease on life. The Rev. Harding Hughes is doing excellently as the new chaplain at St. Mary's School and Junior College.

Please accept our thanks for your help as we do our work, your work, and what we believe is Christ's work.





APPENDIX "C"

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA

Right Reverend Father In God:

The report of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of East Carolina for 1942 is respectfully submitted to you and the Diocesan Convention. Our Program, again this year, followed the plans of the Forward in Service. Packets sent to each of the auxiliaries and upon request to many auxiliaries throughout the nation, contained program material to cover programs called for in the Diocesan Auxiliary Manual. We feel that if the clergy would urge and assist their Auxiliaries in a systematic use of the Diocesan Manual that great interest and benefit would be aroused in their parishes.

As we review the work which has been undertaken during this triennium we feel that all requirements have been met; all subjects set forth by the Triennial Meeting have been carefully presented and studied and an effort made to keep our members well informed as to the work of the Church.

Parish reports of the Educational work indicate that definite, if slow, progress has been made in that field. The educational work advocated and done has been that recommended by the General Church. The study and practice of Worship have been emphasized. Two courses at the Diocesan Adult Conference which was held at Camp Leach (June 7-12) were provided by this department.

The Supply Department filled the allotments from the National Office and also contributed to the Orphanage, the Good Shepherd Hospital, the Inland Waterway Mis-

sions, and boxes of used clothing were sent to missions outside the Diocese,

The Christian Social Relations Department has cooperated with social welfare agencies, working for the Red Cross and other humanitarian organizations. There has been splendid cooperation with all war relief agencies and Auxiliary women have served as hostesses at U. S. O. centers and assisted in providing wholesome recreation for our armed forces.

The United Thank Offering has increased and every parish in the diocese has again given at both Spring and Fall offerings, making the record for the diocese again 100 per cent in participation. There has been a very substantial gain in both the amount of the offering and the number of women sharing in it.

The Church Periodical Club has done a good job of supplying various community centers and recreational units with magazines and literature and has been kept busy filling the ever increaisng demands of that department.

The Promotional Department has grown in scope and responsibility and has now won for itself its well earned position among the major departments of the Diocese.

We urgently suggest that every clergyman read the reports of each of the departments as published in the Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary of this diocese for his own edification. Justice cannot be done to the excellent work of our departmental chairmen in such a brief report as this of necessity must be.

In generalizing the financial report, it may be stated that the Auxiliary in this diocese has a budget of \$2,400 which is raised through an apportionment. The contributions for the year 1942 amount to:

APPENDIX "E"

MEETINGS OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

KINSTON N. C., MAY 12, 1942

At 9:30 P. M., on Tuesday, May 12, 1942, in St. Mary's, Kinston, the Executive Council met and was opened with prayers by the Bishop.

Present: Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D., Rev. Walter R. Noe, Rev. C. E. Williams, Rev. John R. Tolar, Rev. Mortimer Glover, Rev. Alexander Miller, Rev. E. F. Moseley, Rev. Jack R. Rountree, W. G. Gaither, J. A. Moore, W. B. Campbell, and C. R. Wheatley. Rev. John C. Grainger represented the Department of Youth.

The Minutes were read and approved.

The United Canvass Plan was discussed and Rev. Alexander Miller, Chairman of the Promotion Department was requested to present the Plan to the Convention.

A report of the Youth Department was presented by Rev. John. C. Grainger, as follows:

REPORT OF YOUTH DEPARTMENT OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL, DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA, MAY 12, 1942

The Youth Department of the Executive Council is only one year old, created as a result of the report of a temporary Youth Commission appointed by the Bishop. This report reveals startling inadequacles in the work being done for the youth of our Diocese. It was the purpose of the new department to put forward in the Diocese the work of the Church with young people, especially in the age group from 14-25. We were to assist every parish and mission in any way possible, and to integrate all of the work which is being done.

One year has gone by. We have had meetings. We have made talks. We have attempted to stir up interest among adults in working with Youth. We have publicized all of the highlights of the program of the National Youth Department. We have attempted to secure a mailing list of the isolated young people in the diocese. The cooperation of the members of the department has been all that anyone could hope for, but the results have hardly lived up to our expectations.

To be more specific, we might list one or two of the objectives which have been accomplished. Perhaps the most significant achievement is the fact that two courses for youth leaders were included in the first adult Conference at Camp Leach last summer. The few people who attended will testify as to their value. Two such courses will again be included in our conference this coming June. We only hope that more adults will be prevailed upon to attend the 1943 Conference, and to take advantage of these courses.

One other definite accomplishment was the attendance of two representatives at the meeting in Atlanta in February. At this time young people and adults from throughout the Province made definite plans for furthering the Sewanee Youth Program, making that program broader in scope than is true today of the Y. P. S. L. Organization.

In September, 1941, thanks partly to the efforts of this department, a gratifyingly large number of parishes and missions reported participation in the National Youth Sunday observance. A very substantial sum was turned in from East Carolina toward the first Youth offering taken up at that time. We only hope that the same cooperation will be accorded the observance of the National Corporate Communion for Youth on Whitsunday, the fourth Sunday of this month. Plans are now being made to publicize this observance.

Beyond these facts, it would be impossible to say what has been achieved by our department. The difficulty of receiving responses from our letters has rendered the compilation of a list of isolated youth an impossible task. For a year now, we have been trying to get that which should have been obtainable in a very short while. We had hoped to be able to keep in touch with with these young people during this past year.

For the opinions of this department in regard to the necessity of carrying on our work with our young people now in time of war, we would refer you to the report of the committee on the State of the Church. Let it be sufficient to say here that we cannot relinquish the work which we have begun, nor let up on our efforts. There is much to be done in these days, but that "much" must include the preparation of the youth of today for the rebuilding of tomorrow. It will be impossible for us to have as many meetings in the coming year, and it will be difficult for us to take advantage of as many opportunities for publicly promoting the work in which the department is interested. However, we shall continue to bend our efforts toward the advancement of a cause in which we believe, hoping for a more whole-

hearted support from the clergy and the laity of the Diocese.

The Rev. E. F. Moseley, Chairman of the Department of Christian Education was requested to present to the Convention a schedule of Summer Conferences at Camp Leach.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.





EXTRACTS FROM CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

CANON 43

OF THE DUE CELEBRATION OF SUNDAYS

All persons within this church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, by regular participation in the public worship of the Church, by hearing the Word of God read and taught, and by other acts of devotion and works of charity, using all godly and sober conversation.

CANON 44, SECTION 1

OF REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE LAITY

Section 1. A communicant in good standing removing from one parish or congregation to another shall be entitled to receive and shall procure from the Rector or Minister of the parish or congregation of his or her last residence, or if there be no Rector or Minster, from one of the Wardens, a certificate stating that he or she is duly registered or enrolled as communicant in the parish or congregation from which he or she desires to be transferred and the Rector or Minister or Warden of the parish or congregation to which such communicant may remove, shall enroll him or her as a communicant when such certificate is presented, or, on failure to procure such certificate through no fault of such communicant, upon other evidence of his or her being such a communicant sufficient in the judgment of the Rector or Minister. Notice of such enrollment in such parish or congregation to which such communicant shall have removed, shall be sent by the Rector or the Minister thereof to the Rector of the parish from which the communicant is removed.

The attendance at our meetings has been good and a fine spirit of fellowship and cooperation has prevailed.

Report of Department of Finance

1944

The Rev. John R. Tolar presented the report of the Department of Finance, which was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF FINANCE DEPARTMENT

Bishop, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Convention:

The financial position of the Diocese gives us cause for encouragement and thankfulness. We began 1943 with a balance in hand of \$10,449.30. We received from all sources \$69,248.45 and disbursed \$74,088.47 leaving us a balance to begin this year of \$5,609.28. We closed the year with all bills paid and our full quota to the General Church met. The amounts received from parishes and missions was \$1,948.96 more than we received in 1942 and represents a new high since the depression. Our expectations as reported by parishes and missions are more for this year than for 1943.

The Department met in February in St. Mary's, Kinston and adopted a budget for 1944 amounting to \$46,800.00 based on the following probable sources of income: parishes and missions \$40,000; appropriation from General Church \$2,359.00; specials and investments \$4,750.00; total \$47,109.00. This budget includes a General Church quota of \$8,000.00 and \$500.00 for the University of the South.

Before leaving 1943 receipts, I wash to commend especially the Good Shepherd Wilmington and St. Peter's Washington for substantial over-payments of their promised quotas, as well as St. Andrew's, Wrightsville, St. Anne's, Jacksonville, St. Philip's, Tar Landing, St. Mary's, Belhaven, St. Luke's, Winterville and St. Jude's, Aurora which also paid more than their expectations. St. Joseph's, Fayetteville was the first colored parish to pay in full and they have already repeated for 1944.

The new quota system for parishes and missions which was presented to the Convention last year and later again presented at a series of regional meetings, has been generally accepted. In the Convocation of Wilmington only six parishes and two missions failed to accept it. In the Convocation of Edenton, seven parishes and two missions and in the Colored Convocation only one parish accepted but all missions. Even those places which did not accept have generally increased their giving.

Our very necessary goal for 1945, which should be the object of the Every Member Canvass this fall, is the full quota accepted and paid by every parish and mission. Our General Church Quota for next year will be increased \$300.00, and as the Bishop finds

men to fill fields now vacant, the item of stipends must also be increased. The budget should be based not on \$40,000 from parishes and missions as for this year, but on the full \$45,000. However, no budget will be prepared until the returns are in and the parishes and missions tell us what we can reasonably expect. If every place in the diocese will put its shoulder to the wheel and accept its proportionate part of the necessary expenses of the diocese, which is what the quotas represent, and then make a real effort to pay them, much could be accomplished in East Carolina. We are not far from the goal this year; let's put across the whole program in 1945.

One of the outstanding pieces of work done in 1943 was the work of a Committee of Laymen headed by Mr. W. G. Gaither. This Committee raised during the year the sum of \$9350.00 for the retirement of the diocesan debt. This sum has been turned over to the treasurer but does not appear in his report as it came in after his books were closed. The debt is now only \$2,333.44 and if every parish and mission in the diocese will make a special effort and pay in full the amount of their expectations as listed in the Mission Herald, we can pay off the small balance this year. The Department recommends that any sum in excess of the \$42,-475.50 promised be applied to this purpose. This Debt Committee, entirely volunteer, deserves the grateful thanks of the entire diocese for the great amount of work which they did. This Department thanks them and also thanks those who contributed to the fund which they raised. We are virtually a debt-free diocese for the first time in many, many years.

It was moved that the order of the day for 2:00 P. M. be the election of delegates to the Provincial Synod. Adopted.

The Bishop read his Annual Address. (See Appendix "A")

The Bishop appointed the Rev. A. J. Mackie, Mr. J. D. Grimes and Mr. J. Haywood Jones a committee on nominations.

Noon-day prayers were read by the Ven. R. I. Johnson. The Bishop stated that the offering at the Communion Service was for a building at Gaus' Landing.

The order of the day having been reached, the Rev. Israel Harding Hughes presented the needs of St. Mary's School and Junior College for \$500 000.00 for repairs and improvements. The Rev. E. F. Moseley offered a resolution of endorsement of the plan for raising this money which was adopted.

The report of the Thompson Orphanage was presented by the Rev. John C. Grainger, and the plan of the Orphanage to raise \$50,000.00 was approved.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION M. D. WHISNANT, SUPERINTENDENT

I want to convey to you a picture of our institution for the year 1943. Financially we are better off than we have been for a number of years; if not in the history of the institution. This does not mean that we have more money than we know what to do with; but that our budget is balanced, we have no outstanding bills, and our receipts for 1944 will be ample enough to take care of our needs; an estimate based on the fact that the Thanksgiving Offering, about which we can never be certain, will be as much as it was in 1943.

The newest and most badly needed addition to our financial program, the Sustaining Fund, has made it possible for us to avoid borrowing money from the bank. In 1941 it was necessary

for us to borrow \$8,625.00; in 1942 we borrowed \$4,500.00. During 1943 we did not have to borrow from the bank, but instead we used \$3,364.52 from the Sustaining Fund, which we have already paid back, and thus we were able to save on interest as well as establish our financial independence.

Under the existing circumstances the staff is doing very well, however, this department of our institution should be improved. Realizing that the matrons are the backbone of any institution, they should always be of the best caliber possible. The field from which we draw is extremely limited, therefore it is a most difficult task to obtain the kind of matrons we should have. There is a great deal of restlessness among domestic workers, brought about by the war. The high prices being paid in the war industries have made it hard for us to keep domestic workers employed.

During the year we cared for ninety-six children. We began the year with seventy-eight, admitted eighteen, discharged thirteen, and at the present time we have a population of eightythree.

The children are doing a splendid job. Our population is much younger than it has been in former years; we have only one seventeen year old boy and one eighteen year old girl. However, these young boys and girls are doing the work that was formerly done by a much older group, and in addition there are many added duties on the farm, which is in full production, and in the dairy barn.

The children's school work is satisfactory and very much improved over that of other years. We had two graduates in 1943; both were on the school honor roll, and one was a member of the National Honor Society. Both these children graduated with college units. In addition to the two seniors we had twenty-two children who had either all A's or all S's. This is an excellent record. During 1943 we had three children who failed to pass their grades. Two of these three were new children who did not have the necessary background to take up their interrupted school work and pass it. Our institution is built to take care of normal children.

Last summer Mr. M. E. Pierson equipped our sewing room with two electric sewing machines. They have made the sewing room a popular place and both the girls and the matrons have made many things with the new machines. We feel that each new activity added to our training program is an important contributing factor to the growth of our children.

Report on the Chapel of the Cross

The farm and dairy herd of twelve cows have contributed more to the life of the institution than I can possibly tell. These activities have given our boys and girls something to do and something to talk about. This has changed our attitude from that of a beggar to a producer. Now we can hold up our heads and let people know that we are contributing and are not wholly dependent upon charity for everything without giving something in return.

The farm produced for the year 1943 the gross amount of \$7,445.94. Of this amount \$5,251.37 is clear profit. The cows produced 6,912.1 gallons of milk at a cost of 21½ cents per gallon. In addition to the hay and silage grown for feeding the stock, we also grew the following vegetables, some of which were canned for winter use: kale, collards, turnips, carrots, radishes, onions, lettuce, May peas, beets, Irish potatoes, green beans, squash, corn, beans, butter beans, cucumbers, cantaloupe, tomatoes, okra, watermelons, sweet potatoes, peanuts, Swiss chard, Chinese cabbage, cabbage, egg plant, and bell pepper. It might be interesting for you to note that no tomatoes or soup mixture have been bought by the Orphanage since 1941.

In conclusion, I would like to say that no institution of this type can successfully operate without a program of varied activities of a nature in which children can easily engage. I would also like to express our sincere gratitude to the loyal supporters of the Thompson Orphanage, without whose help we could never successfully operate.

It is our plan to go ahead with the campaign for \$50,000 and also with the kitchen and dining room. Part of the \$50,000 will be used for a revolving fund and part for a permanent improvement fund. We are being held up for the time being because in the Diocese of North Carolina it seems that we have to have the consent of the Diocesan Convention in order to raise money.

The report of the work at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, was read by the Secretary, as follows:

REPORT OF THE COLLEGE WORK AT CHAPEL HILL

This year the University of North Carolina had the largest enrollment in its history. During the winter there were a thousand more men and women here than there has ever been in peace time. Naturally this means more work for the Church. Most of

these students are in uniform. The Navy Pre-Flight School numbers about 1875 men. The Navy V-12 program has about 1300 enrolled. Almost all of the medical students are in uniform. The two Army Schools in the University have been discontinued, but many of the men were active in the Church while they were here. The civilians in the University are freshmen under 18, 4Fs, about 700 girls, and an increasing number of men discharged from the services.

It is difficult to discover just how many of these folks are Episcopalians. A conservative estimate is that at any one time between 450 and 500 of them are members of our Church. Since the turnover is rapid in the Pre-Flight School and fairly rapid in the V-12 program, probably 700 Episcopalians are on the campus in the course of a year.

Attendance at the Church services has been good, though sometimes erratic and disappointing. The Canterbury Club for students has done well. The Pre-Flight cadets are allowed to make their communions only once a month. On that Sunday we move the 11:00 o'clock service up to 10:30 and omit the sermon. This arrangement is necessary so they can return to their base in time for the next required formation.

With the consent of their bishops, boys in the V-12 program can enroll as pre-chaplain students. The Navy then gives them a college education and sends them on through the Seminary. We have helped two men sign up for this training. We have discouraged others.

Mr. Lawrence has announced he will retire from the active ministry of the Church on September 1st. He plans to continue to live in Chapel Hill

In the other colleges in this area the Church continues its ministry. The Rev. H. N. Parsley is the full time worker at Duke where the situation is similar to ours. Miss Margaret Fletcher continues her fine work at St. Mary's House on the edge of the campus of the Woman's College in Greensboro. About fifteen colleges were represented at the annual North Carolina Episcopal College Students Conference held at St. Mary's House last February.

Report No. 2 of the Department of Finance was adopted as follows:

Resolved: That the Treasurer of the Diocese be authorized to pay the expenses to the Convention of clergymen not yet connected with the Diocese who are now located and serving therein and of such clergymen as may have been prevented from being present at the opening of the Convention and also Candidates for Holy Orders and Postulants who are now serving in the Diocese.

Resolved Further: That the Treasurer be instructed to pay the Sexton of St. Peter's Church \$5.00 for services rendered during the Convention.

Mr. Junius D. Grimes offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved: That the Secretary of each Parish and organized Mission is directed to transmit to the Secretary of the Diocese as soon as practical after the election of delegates to each annual convention of the Diocese a list showing the names of the delegates and alternates to said convention from his Parish or Mission; and the Department of Finance is directed to file with the Sec-

retary of the Diocese not less than thirty days before the convention a copy of the budget to be submitted by it to the convention for adoption, and the Secretary of the Diocese is directed to mail to each delegate and alternate not less than two weeks prior to said convention a copy of said budget and a copy of the last report of the Treasurer of the Diocese. The purpose hereof being that the delegates to each convention may be advised in advance as to the financial condition of the Diocese and the estimated receipts and expenditures for the next fiscal year.

The Bishop made the following statement for the information of the Convention:

"When our Convention met in Greenville a year ago, I was not at all sure that I could continue to serve the Diocese as Bishop for many menths. Thanks to your gracious generosity, I was permitted to enjoy a quiet, restful summer. Thanks to the prayers of my people, I was restored to some measure of my former health. My doctor, however, seems positive that I should not attempt to do more than half what I have done in past years. During the past months I have carried out a fairly full schedule, but have had to confine myself almost entirely to confirmation visitations and have had to decline many opportunities to serve the Church within and without the Diocese. I realize the Diocese needs vigorous leadership now and in days ahead. We cannot afford, nor do we need two Bishops. Consequently unless I should gain in strength beyond the expectation of my physician, I shall decide by November of this year to offer my resignation to the House of Bishops at the meeting to be held in Birmingham, January 3, 1945. This decision will not be taken hastily but after I have been convinced that I am unable to give my beloved Diocese the strong and vigorous leadership that it must have if it is to play its full part in the great task of rebuilding a broken world."

The Bishop was authorized to appoint a committee on arrangements for the Convention of 1945 when the thirtieth anniversary of his consecration will be observed.

The invitation of Christ Church, New Bern, for the Convention to meet there in 1945 was accepted.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Church was presented by the Rev. Mortimer Glover, as follows:

Report of Committee on the State of the Church

1944

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

This committee has examined the statistics of the diocese for 1943, as exhibited by the annual reports of parishes and missions, and having also consulted other sources of information, herewith submits this report.

The work of the committee has been hampered by the failure of some of the clergy to send to the Bishop, as required by canon, their annual reports for the calendar year 1943. It seems to the committee that four months is excessive time for anyone to take in compiling figures that should be available shortly after the close of the year, and we suggest that this Convention call attention of all clergy and parish and mission treasurers to the necessity of filing reports in a reasonable time after the close of each year.

On the basis of such figures as are available we find that in the diocese during 1943 there were 266 Baptisms compared to 330 the previous year; 152 marriages compared to 170; 135 burials compared to 161; 252 confirmations compared with 316. The total number of communicants 7896 compared to 7827 the previous year.

These figures seem to indicate that in spite of the considerable growth of population of our diocese last year some condition has resulted in a considerable decrease in the number of special services performed. We suggest that the shortage of clergy in the diocese is the chief cause. Although we have the same number of clergy as last year. 46, the increasing demands on their time, and the strain of another year's effort to cover more territory than should be expected of them has caused a slowing down in their activity and is impairing the efficiency of their work. The committee has no suggestion how to remedy this condition except to call attention to the obvious fact that all vacancies in the diocese should be filled as soon as available clergy can be found.

In the meantime, we pay tribute to those devoted clergy who have assumed additional work, and are spreading themselves over several fields in addition to their own, and are serving loyally to keep up the work of our diocese in trying times under difficult conditions. We also gratefully acknowledge the contribution made to the Church in our diocese by several clergymen, retired for age or disability, who have gotten back into harness and at considerable sacrifice are giving themselves to the work in this part of the Master's vineyard. In many places work has gone forward under lay leaders, who have given faithful and ef-

ficient service in many parishes and missions that have been without the services of a clergyman. Nine of the clergy of the diocese are in war service, while four clergymen are doing supply work in the diocese. Lay workers who are giving full time number two in the inland waterway missions, two in industrial centers, three in Army and Navy work, and three as teachers. The number of laymen who are giving part time service is very large, but no estimate of their number is available.

We note with dcep gratitude to Almighty God the restoration of our Bishop to a considerable degree of his former health. In spite of his disability last year, the number of confirmations was almost as large as the year before. This was made possible through the generous contribution of their time by various bishops of neighboring dioceses and retired bishops, who came in from time to time to make visitations and administer confirmation as their services were required. We express the grateful appreciation of our diocese to these bishops, and hope their services can be secured as needed during the rest of this year, so as to spare Bishop Darst any unnecessary strain upon his recently recovered health.

The increase in number of communicants is the reflection of the growth in general population in our diocese, although the communicant increase is not generally proportionate to the population increase. We remember though that such sudden population increase naturally is very slowly reflected in Church communicant numbers.

The building of three new churches was completed in the diocase last year and others are under way in places where opportunities for the services of our Church have increased. Thus, in spite of difficulties, the Church is moving forward and developing new fields in East Carolina.

In this connection we call attention to the healthy development and extension of the Negro work in our diocese, the building of one new church in a Negro parish and repairs and improvements to physical property in other fields. Opportunities and responsibilities have arisen in many places and we hope these will be met by additional workers and equipment as soon as they can be supplied, especially in connection with work among Negro students and other members of the race in the Elizabeth City field.

Financially the diocese has shown a very healthy advance. Contributions for Diocesan and General Church work increased by 2,000, although the total did not reach the full amount of our

diocesan budget. The Lenten offering of the Church Schools increased by \$900, and nearly all churches showed a considerable increase in the amounts received and expended for local support. We hope this condition will continue, and that the diocese may share in larger measure in the increased prosperity that has come to the parishes and missions of our Church. Your committee would also call grateful attention to the work of the laymen's committee under Mr. W. G. Gaither in raising funds that have practically liquidated in full our old and bothersome diocesan debt, although this was not completed until 1944, and properly belongs to next year's report.

With so much of this year already gone by it does not seem wise to this committee to make any specific recommendations to the Convention about plans and policies, and so we submit this general survey in hope that it may be acceptable as information regarding conditions and trends that may be significant in the life of our diocese.

Mr. H. Edmund Rogers for the Committee on Canons, recommended that Canon 9 be amended by adding after the last paragraph of Section 2 of Canon 9, the following:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS

Pursuant to resolution of the Camp Leach Committee passed at meeting in September, 1943, the Committee on Canons recommends that Cannon 9 be amended by adding after the last paragraph of Section 2 of Canon 9 the following:

(a) A Camp Leach Committee, to consist of the Vice-Chairman of the Department of Christian Education, the Vice-Chairman of the Department of Youth, a lay member representing the Trustees of the Diocese, a representative of the Department of Finance, two representatives of the Woman's Auxiliary, to be nominated by that body, a layman and a laywoman representing the Young Peoples Service League and other youth organiza-

tions, to be nominated by the All Youth Conference, and three general members — to wit, a Clergyman and two laymen. The Bishop and Executive Secretary of the Diocese shall be ex-officio members of the Committee. The members of the Committee not hereinbefore specifically indicated shall be nominated by the Bishop at the annual Diocesan Convention and be confirmed by a vote of the Convention.

- (b) The Committee shall elect from its own membership an Executive Committee to consist of seven members. The Bishop and Executive Secretary of the Diocese shall be members exofficio of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall possess and may exercise all of the powers of the Camp Leach Committee between meetings of the said Camp Leach Committee.
- (c) The Committee shall have control of and shall supervise and direct the management, welfare, maintenance and financial support of Camp Leach, subject to such regulations and limitations as the Committee may impose and to that end may elect a Business Manager who shall have direct charge of the maintenance, welfare and activities of Camp Leach, subject to such rules, by-laws and regulations as the Committee may establish. The Business Manager shall be a member of the Camp Leach Committee and shall be bonded in the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00). He shall submit to the said Camp Leach Committee an annual report of his management, including an audit of his accounts annually.
- (d) Title to the property constituing Camp Leach and its equipment shall be vested in the Trustees of the Diocese, subject to the use, control and management of the same by the Camp Leach Committee and without responsibility or liability for the acts or management of the same by the said Camp Leach Committee, and no general property or assets of the diocese shall be liable for any debt or obligation of the Camp Leach Committee. The Trustees of the Diocese shall be empowered, upon written request of the Camp Leach Committee, duly approved by the Bishop or Ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese, and after 60 days notice in the Mission Herald, to sell and dispose of all or any part of the property held by it for the use and benefit of the Camp Leach Committee as aforesaid.
- (e) This canon shall not take effect until the annual meeting of the Camp Leach Committee.

1944 Elections

A resolution by Mr. Frank F. Fagan was adopted as follows:

Resolved: That we have been deeply impressed by the statement of our beloved Bishop of his intention to retire on his thirtieth anniversary as Bishop of this Diocese, should his doctor advise such action, and that it is the earnest desire and prayer of this Convention that he will be so greatly improved in health by next January that he will be able to continue his active services to this Diocese, which have been so faithfully and lovingly performed during the past thirty years.

After the report of the Nominating Committee, the following were elected:

The report of the Ven. R. I. Johnson, Archdeacon, was presented as follows:

REPORT OF ARCHDEACON OF COLORED WORK

What is the Colored Work of the Diocese of East Carolina? It consists of 17 parishes and missions with property valued at around \$142,530. In these parishes and mission there are according to the Living Church Annual 1077 communicants ministered to by seven priests. There are two self-supporting parishes, St. Mark's and St. Joseph's, of which the Diocese may be very proud as these parishes are very few in the Province of Sewanee. With the addition this year of \$300 to the salary of their Priest at St. Cyprian's that parish is measurably nearer to self-support and it should be assured very soon if there are any permanent elements in the recent growth in population and activity of New Bern as a community.

The properties of the Colored Convocation are in better shape today than for many years past. Much needed renovations have been carried out at Belhaven, Washington, Kinston, Haddocks, and Beaufort. Two new buildings are in process of erection at Farmville and Sladesville through the cooperation of the Diocese, the National Council and the people. On behalf of all I wish to express to the Bishop and Diocesan Council the appreciation felt by them for the encouragement given in their work, and especially to Mr. Noe for his understanding, sympathy, and efforts to advance the work and improve the status of the workers. Not the least of the benefits of this united interest has been the improvements in the salaries of the missionary clergy in which the National Council assisted on the recommendation of the new Division of Negro Work which through Mr. Harris, the Secretary for Negro Work, had made an intensive study of our work and its needs. I have reason to believe that there is a special interest in our work on the part of the Division to which I have the honor to belong which means that we shall very probably receive further encouragement for the development of our equipment and The Archdeacon was heartened last year by a word from Mr. Robert Strange giving assurance that the Layman's Thank Offering stood ready to give encouragement to the program of the Colored Convocation.

One old mission which went out of existence some years ago at Williamston is now being hopefully revived and services are being held regularly at the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Gray. Mr. Gray was the patient at Good Shepherd Hospital who was carried into the Church to be confirmed last year by Bishop Littell. Now at home and from his wheel chair he has taken for his task the business of interesting his friends and neighbors in

the resurrection of our work in Williamston. The services thus far held have been crowded. Whenever we can house the activities there I am confident that the future of the mission will be assured.

Our opportunities today are very great.

Evangelistically that opportunity is tremendous. There are 300,000 Negroes in East Carolina. The proportion of them that belong to religious bodies is about the same as for the country as a whole. Of the ten million Negroes in the country fully seven million are outside the churches. It is impressive to note the number of people who have never heard of the Episcopal Church and who on discovering it, are moved by a strange and impelling fascination by its services. The coming of many thousands into our fellowship waits only on an increased missionary ardor on the part of our clergy and people. In us men are discovering the Church whose business is Religion and the ministration of the Word of Truth and the Sacraments of power.

More than the impelling beauty of her worship is the strength of the life of her Catholic Fellowship. Long before men thought of Inter-racial Commissions of Regional Councils the Church occupied the inter-racial position, in fact since Jamestown. That position has special significance today in a world filled with storm and stress. To preserve mutual understanding and good will within our fold today, is to set before the world a moral dynamic of immeasurable possibilities; and to hold the key to the future, and recall the Psalmist's benediction "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity. It is like the precious ointment upon the head that ran down upon the beard, even Aaron's beard, that went down to the skirts of his garment; for there the Lord commanded the blessing, even life forever more."

The report of the Good Shepherd Hospital was presented by the Ven. R. I. Johnson, as follows:

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT GOOD SHEPHERD HOSPITAL, NEW BERN, N. C.

Bishop Darst and Members of the Annual Convention:

On the first day of this coming July, we shall have operated the Good Shepherd Hospital for six years. During the year 1943 we treated 664 patients to whom we gave 7,218 days of care. Significant of the condition of the times is the fact that 544 of the

664 patients were full-pay patients. Of the rest 89 were part-pay, and 31 free. There were 61 newborn. The cost of treating these patients was over \$20,000.

During the year there has been a steady increase in overhead expenses. Drugs and other surgical and medical necessities have been very expensive, personnel has had to be increased, wages have had to be greatly augmented. Yet we actually succeeded in cutting one cent from the daily per capita cost of treating patients. In 1942 it was 2.74; in 1943 2.73.

The keeping of help has been a grievous difficulty. One may never know from day to day whether the hospital minor help will be on the job. Professional types are more constant. By June 1st we shall have eight nurses. On the whole their services are satisfactory. I am only a layman in this field and I know only what I have learned in my brief exposure to the life of a hospital and what people tell me. And doctors say that there are certain characteristic difficulties in all hospitals and that they find less of them at the Good Shepherd than at most hospitals they know about. So, I suppose there are certain inevitabilities to which I must become reconciled. Six years have contributed measureably to the process of overcoming the handicap of being a new thing in a community and that laid no burden of sacrifice on the community which received its benefits. Today, our people are proud of the Good Shepherd, wonder how we ever did without it, and are making use of its facilities.

As a result of our services the colored people are receiving a higher type of medical service than at any time in their history and not the least of the beneficiaries of the hospital has been the medical fraternity. People come to us now from an ever widening area and the growing hospital consciousness of the people tends to enlarge our possibilities of usefulness as the years go on.

The new 25-bed addition is completed and makes a very attractive and useful agency for expanded services. Furniture is all in and the arrival of additional nurses will make possible the fullest use of this annex. The old building is now almost overtaxed.

Another recent allotment of \$46,000 has been made by the Federal Government for the erection of a nurses home, bids for which will be received during the next month. This will very definitely complete our equipment for the time being. Our nurses live out in different parts of the city and the people who are kind enough to keep them do so at considerable loss as rooms used by them would bring much more money rented to Cherry

Point civilian workers. The superintendent is very grateful for our friends' fine spirit of accommodation. However the arrangement is very unsatisfactory.

Our medical and surgical staff remains the same: Drs. Wadsworth and Fisher; Drs. Duffy and Martin; Drs. Kafer and Mann. All doctors of the community bring us patients at some time and are welcomed to the use of our facilities and personnel. Commendation is heard on all sides of the fine work done by our staff. There have been many cases of remarkable clinical value, rare cases which have been handled without difficulty. We are very proud of these gentlemen whose prestige and ability we so beneficially share as an institution. For all that all of our doctors are overworked, attention at the Good Shepherd does not lag; and the three colored men, Drs. Mann, Fisher and Martin have been of great service in taking care of our emergencies and house routine.

In May 1943 the nospital was duly incorporated and adopted a set of by-laws. Connection with the Church, however, has been preserved by the requirement that trustees shall be elected by the Convention of the Diocese of East Carolina and Bishop Darst is Ex-Officio Chairman. Present Trustees are Rev. Walter R. Noe, Chairman; R. I. Johnson, Secretary; Rev. C. E. Williams, Rev. Stephen Gardner, Mr. E. K. Bishop, Mr. I. H. Smith, Mr. W. C. Chadwick, Prof. J. T. Barber, Mr. Wm. Dunn, Mr. John G. Dunn, Jr., Mrs. John D. Whitford, and Mrs. R. N. Duffey.

All have taken an active interest in the Hospital and many have rendered outstanding services, notably our chairman, Mr. Noe, whose knowledge and experience especially in insurance matters has saved us during the past few weeks a considerable amount of money.

Thoughtful friends still stand by us with much needed aid. We are especially grateful to many branches of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of East Carolina for donations of money and large amounts of supplies which must come from almost every branch in the Diocese. Community social and civic clubs take pride in sending us donations of fruits and vegetables from time to time. Children in rural schools send us gifts of vegetables and whole classes in the city schools send Christmas and Thanksgiving donations.

A number of white friends even save us the broth in which they boil their chickens for soup stock.

The ministry of prayer is constantly offered as the Superintendent is also Chaplain. No one goes to the operating room without preparation and our special prayer that God will heal him not

only in body but also in soul and spirit and each Sunday prayers are said throughout the hospital with every patient.

By the continued generous encouragement of our Bishop and the people of East Carolina we carry on with ever deepening gratitude for your unfailing interest and friendship.

Money spent by parish for service men's program, not including gifts of food, furniture and supplies, \$1,004.71. Service men have been actively interested in the choir and the Parish Council and have participated in other parish activities.

The wives of officers and enlisted men have been active in the Woman's Auxiliary, the Guilds and other parish organizations and activities.

The Seymour-Johnson field is near Goldsboro.

Christ Church, New Bern, the Rev. Charles E. Williams, rector. Salary of a woman worker, Mrs. Alexander P. Clayton and a small discretionary fund. The parish serves men and women from the Marine Bases at Cherry Point and New River, and other nearby fields. One floor of the parish house has been made into a very attractive service lounge which is kept open every week end and at other times.

Meals are served; homes are found for those needing them and entertainment in many forms is provided.

Jacksonville, St. Anne's. Salary of worker, F. N. Cox. Sunday services are held—Church School in the morning; Morning service at 11:00 and evening service at 8:00. The Vestry Committee is composed of Marine Officers and people who are closely connected with the work at Camp Lejeune at New River. The choir has a number of Marines, both officers and enlisted men and their wives, in it.

Fayelteville, St. John's. Rev. James F. Ferneyhough, Rector. Discretionary Fund. The parish serves the people of Fort Bragg and nearby camps. Entertainment and refreshments are provided. From 75 to 100 attend the meetings provided for the men and the Church services are attended by both officers and men and their families.

Wilmington, St. John's. Rev. E. W. Halleck, rector. Discretionary Fund which is used by Young People's Service League for entertainment of soldiers and sailors who visit Wilmington. Report shows two parties for British soldiers, seven parties for our soldiers and marines. Reception for a soldier and his wife. In

summer months served ice cream to soldiers and marines each Sunday night. Many of the men who have attended the League parties have attended Church services and some have been active in Church activities.

Good Shepherd, Wilmington. Rev. Harvey W. Glazier, Rector. Discretionary Fund. This has been used largely for equipment and material that would enable the parish to serve the large number of people in that area. Special attention has been given to the children of the men in service and a great deal of personal work has been done.

Southport, St. Philip's. Part of the salary of the Rev. Cecil Alligood is paid out of the appropriation and he is allowed a small Discretionary Fund for travel and other expenses. There is a very large sectional Navy Base near Southport and Coast Guardsmen at nearby points. The Navy is now providing quarters for 200 WAVES. We could not keep a man at Southport and give him a reasonable salary without help, and it is very important to have an active man there at this time.

Fayetteville, St. Joseph's (Colored). Rev. J. S. Braithwaite, rector. Discretionary Fund. Thousands of Negro troops are at Fort Bragg. The report shows an attendance of 986 soldiers at the church services; 21,683 at church picnics and socials and 7,087 girls chaperoned for dances and banquets at Fort Bragg. The rector reports 73 visits to Fort Bragg himself; conducting eighteen services and assisting with 12 other services there; besides 43 hospital calls on Negro soldiers, 327 office consultations; 14 soldier baptisms, seven marriages and three confirmations.

Wilmington, St. Mark's. Rev. L. C. Dade, Rector. Discretionary Fund. This is used by the Social Committee of the parish in caring for the many Negro soldiers and Marines who come to Wilmington. Parties and other social gatherings are provided for and meals are served them. Many of them stay in the homes of the people of the parish while they are in Wilmington.

Wrightsville, St. Andrew's. Discretionary Fund used by the Woman's Auxiliary for equipment, supplies and expense in ministering to the large number of soldiers and their families and Coast Guardsmen in that section.

The church has social meetings for the men of the Coast Guard Station at Wrightsville and has provided recreation and refreshments for men in service and their families who live at Wrightsville Beach, Harbor Island and Wrightsville Sound.

Inland Waterway Workers: Discretionary Fund. A most help-

ful part of our program has been the work done by our Inland Waterway workers, not only for service men and their families who have attended the Inland Waterway Churches, but for the wives and children of service men in many places in the Diocese. The past year they had a vacation school in the villages near Wilmington with an attendance of more than 50 children. Later, they took part in a vacation school conducted by all religious bodies working in those villages. Associated with them was one of our laymen from Philadelphia, who came here for the purpose of assisting in this and other work. They had a vacation Bible School at Midway between Jacksonville and Swannsboro, where hundreds of Marines and their families live. They also had one at Jacksonville and, in addition to the school, made a complete religious survey of the town of Jacksonville.

Beaufort, St. Paul's. When Rev. E. C. McConnell was at Beaufort, he was given a discretionary fund by the Army and Navy Commission, but when he left no one asked for this fund. It was not made a part of our askings for the past year. Since Dr. Edgar Jones has been in that field he has done a great deal of work and early in the year the vestry asked for \$25.00 a month on his salary. We have been able to send him \$75.00 for February, March and April out of a small unused balance of the former appropriation and we recommend an appropriation of \$25.00 a month for the present year. There are large numbers of service men in this part of the Diocese.

By adjustments in some of the discretionary funds we can take care of the request of the rector of St. John's, Fayetteville, for an increase of \$10.00 a month for the present year.

This report would not be complete without some mention of the good work that has been done by a number of parishes and missions that have not been aided by the National Commission.

St. James' and St. Paul's in Wilmington; Christ Church, Elizabeth City; and a number of the smaller parishes and missions of the Diocese.

Last year, Christ Church, Elizabeth City asked for a woman worker and St. John's, Fayetteville for a layman, and many other places asked for help but the Commission could not increase our appropriation at that time. It is not in position now to do very much more but may have the funds later, if the Church responds generously to the recent appeal of the Commission for \$400,000 for its work. Only about one-fourth of that amount has been raised.

THE CHURCH PENSION FUND

April 11, 1944

My dear Mr. Noe:

This letter is sent to you prior to the scheduled meeting of your Convention, for the purpose of supplying you with material which may be of value in presenting a brief report on the administration of The Church Pension Fund.

Attached hereto is a list of the pensions which the Fund is now paying to beneficiaries in East Carolina. This is usually of interest to the Diocese and Missionary Districts, inasmuch as The Church Penson Fund is maintained by the Church for the sole purpose of providing pensions for the clergy and their families. In your case, the total pensions now amount to \$10,004. a year, whereas your total pension assessments amount to about \$5,100. a year. The total pension roll of the Fund is now almost \$1,400,000. a year, whereas the total pension assessments payable to the Fund are now at the rate of about \$1,100,000. a year. The difference results from the operation of the actuarial reserve system.

The record in the payment of pension assessments continues to be almost perfect. The current arrears, throughout the Church, are smaller than at any previous time in the history of the Fund. The same statement was made last year, but the record is still better now. So far as previous years are concerned, the total arrears due from any parish, mission or other ecclesiastical organization anywhere in the Church for the period subsequent to the beginning of the Fund on March 1, 1917, amount to less than one-third of one per cent of the total payable for this entire period. Even some of these old arrears are being cleared up from time to time. The Trustees are tremendously grateful for the manner in which the Church has so wholeheartedly accepted this important responsibility.

The present assets of The Church Pension Fund amount to approximately \$37,600,000. and exceed the total reserves and other liabilities by about \$2,900,000. Both of these figures are somewhat larger than a year ago. Also the most recent valuation of the Fund's investments showed a market value substantially in

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excess of their book value. The Fund, therefore, continues to be in a healthy financial condition.

The main difficulty with which the Trustees are faced is still in respect to the effect of declining interest yields available on high grade investments. That is something beyond the control of the Trustees. The average yield on the Fund's investments has improved slightly but it is still below the requirements. The Trustees are unwilling to sacrifice the high quality of Fund's portfolio in an effort to improve the average yield at the risk of capital loss. Inasmuch as the investment income is an important element in the Trustees' ability to increase pensions beyond the originally promised amounts, the continuation of the present program of additional benefits is becoming more difficult. At present the total pension roll is about thirty per cent larger than would have been the case if the Trustees had not undertaken to grant additional benefits beyond those guaranteed in the original promises.

The Fund's who!ly-owned subsidiaries are progressing satisfactorily and are in excellent financial condition. They are The Church Hymnal Corporation, the Church Life Insurance Corporation and The Church Properties Fire Insurance Corporation. Aside from being extremely valuable assets of The Church Pension Fund, they are each performing useful functions for the benefit of the Church The more they are used by the Church, the greater will be the advantage derived both by the Fund and by the Church.

The above is very brief but supplies some of the essential facts of interest. I should be glad to furnish any additional information or details which may be requested.

Once more, I welcome this opportunity of expressing, personally and in behalf of the Trustees, my sincere appreciation to you and others for the cooperation we have been given in our administration of The Church Pension Fund and its Affiliates. They could not have reached their present stage of successful development without the confidence and support of the whole Church. I hope that the future developments will justify a continuance of your interest and cooperation.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS



BISHOP'S ANNUAL ADDRESS, 1944

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of East Carolina:

"Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ."

It is with a sense of profound gratitude to Almighty God that I welcome you to the sixty-first Annual Convention of the Diocese and the thirtieth over which I have had the privilege of presiding.

It is hard to realize that I have had the high honor of being Bishop of East Carolina during nearly half of its existence as a diocese and I find mere words hopelessly inadequate when I try to express my thanks to our Sovereign Leader Christ, and to you friends and fellow laborers, for the wonderful years in which we have been permitted to serve Him in this corner of His vineyard.

As I look back over the past year, my first thought is one of humble gratitude to our clergy and people for their kindness and tender solicitude during my long and trying illness. In my weakness I felt the loving and sympathetic interest of my people surrounding me, and in moments of depression and discouragement I was heartened and strengthened by the blessed consciousness that at every altar and in every home the prayers of the faithful were being offered for my recovery. It is natural, therefore, that having been restored to a fair measure of my former health, my heart is very full of the joy of God as I stand before you today. Not only am I grateful to the clergy and laity for their loyal cooperation and more than generous interest, but I desire to place in this permanent record my heartfelt thanks to my brother Bishops who so gladly and willingly came to my assistance during my illness. This Convention will, I am sure, desire to make some suitable expression of gratitude to Bishops Penick, Gribbin, Jett and Littell who gave so generously of their time during the past year without any cost to the diocese

save their modest expenses that were taken care of from my Bishop's Fund.

It would be impossible in the space of time that I have allotted to this address to give adequate recognition to all of the outstanding events of 1943, but I must at least mention certain accomplishments that set the year apart as one of the best in the history of our diocese.

During the year we completed two churches, St. Anne's Church, Jacksonville, and St. Philip's Church, Tar Landing. Both churches are located in strategic centers and both are witnesses for Christ and His blessed program in fields of unlimited opportunity for service.

Two other churches are being constructed by and for two of our hopeful and rapidly growing colored missions— St. Timothy's, Farmville, and St. Thomas', Sladesville.

A suitable lot has been secured at Carolina Beach and it is earnestly hoped that we may soon begin the erection of a church for the large number of our Church people who are residing in that rapidly growing town.

Plans are also underway for the construction of a small church or community building at Gaus' Landing, another of our hopeful mission stations on the Inland Waterway.

We are also pleased to report that extensive repairs and improvements have been made at St. Mary's, Burgaw, St. Andrew's, Calabash, St. Augustine's, Kinston, St. Andrew's, Wrightsville Sound, St. Paul's, Washington, St. Mary's, Belhaven and at Camp Leach.

The Laymen's Thank Offering, which is growing in interest and financial support, has played a fine part in making it possible to build and equip our new churches and the diocese owes a debt of gratitude to the faithful and loyal laymen who have so gladly accepted their responsibility as "workers with God" in extending His Kingdom to the waste and neglected portions of our Diocese. I trust that the time is not far distant when every layman in East Carolina will share in this high adventure for Christ and His Church.

I am also happy to announce that, thanks to Mr. George B. Elliott, Honorary Chairman, Mr. William B. Gaither, Chairman, and their associates on the special committee, the diocesan debt has been paid and the burden that has hindered the progress of the Diocese for more than ten years has been removed. I am sure the Convention, by suitable resolutions, will desire to place upon our records the grateful appreciation of this tireless labor of love.

Owing to our great Army, Marine, Naval and Air Force population within the bounds of the Diocese, many of our churches have been able to render notable service to the men of our armed forces. The churches that have had the greatest opportunity for such service are Christ Church, Elizabeth City, St. Paul's Church, Edenton, Christ Church, New Bern, St. Paul's Church, Beaufort, St. Anne's Church, Jacksonville, St. Stephen's Church, Goldsboro, St. John's and St. Joseph's Churches, Fayetteville and the five churches in Wilmington..

In spite of our serious shortage of clergy, nine of our finest young clergymen being in service as Chaplains, we have managed to keep our churches open and, with few exceptions, regular services have been maintained. This has been made possible by the loyal and devoted service of our lay readers and our good fortune in securing the assistance of four retired priests who have rendered unusually helpful service. The four retired clergymen, whom we are so happy to have with us are the Rev. Dr. Edgar Jones of the Diocese of Massachusetts, serving St. Paul's, Beaufort; the Rev. M. C. Daughtrev of the Diocese of . Southern Virginia, who has been serving St. Church, Greenville; the Rev. John M. Hamilton of Ohio, who is serving St. Thomas', Windsor; Grace Church, Woodville; St. Marks, Roxobel and Holy Innocents', Avoca. We are happy to report that Mr. Hamilton has consented to remain in that field on a permanent basis. We have also had the devoted service of one of our cwn beloved retired priests, the Rev. Thomas P. Noe, who has

made it possible for the vacant churches in the Wilmington area to have the service of Holy Communion and other services at stated intervals.

We have been most fortunate in being able to take a real part in looking after the new church people who have come into the great industrial area around Wilmington through the wise and understanding labors of Mrs. W. O. S. Sutherland who, through a happy arrangement with the Department of Domestic Missions of the National Council, is giving her splendid talents to that important work.

I would be untrue to my own sense of gratitute to, and loving appreciation of, a beloved fellow laborer, if I did not emphasize especially the truly remarkable labors of our Executive Secretary, the Rev. W. R. Noe. Not only did he carry on the work of the Diocesan office with skill and dispatch during my illness, relieving me of a great deal of worry and anxiety, but, in addition to his full time duties as Executive Secretary, Treasurer, Secretary of the Convention and Editor of The Mission Herald, he is serving as Priest in Charge of all the Inland Waterway missions, St. Andrew's Church, Wrightsville Sound, St. Anne's, Jacksonville, St. Mary's Church, Burgaw and All Souls', North West. In addition to conducting regular services at all of the above places, some on week nights and some on Sundays, he manages to conduct occasional Communion Services in Clinton and Southport as the Minister-in-charge of those churches, the Rev. Cecil Alligood. is in Deacon's Orders. Needless to add, he is doing more than any two men should be expected to do, but his loyalty to the Diocese and to the Cause of Christ will compel him to go on with his heavy schedule until we are able to secure one or two additional clergymen to relieve him of a part of his great task.

Colored Work

There has been marked progress in our colored work during the past year and we are confident that if our present plans are carried through, the next five years will mark a new era of development and growth that will not only extend and strengthen the work among the great population of Negroes in East Carolina but will also demonstrate the genius of the Church in ministering to, and developing the inherent religious character of the young men and women who will be the leaders of their race in a post-war world. To this imperative call we must give our best of time and energy, our prayers and money. The new World Order must be built by men and women of all races who, through proper training, have learned something of the purposes of God.

The appointment of the Ven. Robert I. Johnson as Archdeacon of the Colored Convocation has given a unity and purpose to our program that have been lacking in past years, and while his duties as rector of one of our largest colored parishes and as Superintendent of the Good Shepherd Hospital have necessarily consumed the greater part of his time, he has made a real contribution as the representative of the Bishop and the Diocesan Convention in the great mission field for which, under God, we are responsible.

We are especially happy to announce that through an arrangement on the part of the National Council, the Diocesan Executive Council and the individual parishes and missions, we have been able to increase the salaries of our colored clergy to an amount that will at least relieve some of the financial werries of these faithful and poorly compensated soldiers of the Cross.

Prospects for the Future

We must be conscious of the fact, my brethren, that we are facing the certainty of great changes in our Diocese and our world. Our quiet See City of Wilmington has become a great industrial city and will probably remain so. The towns near our great permanent military posts and bases and air fields are meeting, and will have to continue to meet, opportunities and work out solutions to

problems undreamed of a few years ago. Rural work, the seed ground of our diocesan life, has suffered as our towns have grown. Drained of their youth by war and industrial plants, our country churches are facing problems more serious than most of us realize. Common sense in connection with the future of our Diocese, as well as kindly sympathy for our brethren of the country churches must lead us to the formulating of wise and long range plans for the rehabiliation and strengthening of our rural work. The country clergy must have more adequate support and plans must be worked out for greater concentration on strategic points rather than our present system, forced on us by necessity, of requiring a man to serve from four to seven churches in two or more counties. We cannot, because of the great shortage of available clergy, begin to divide large unwieldly fields now, but we can and must begin to plan for such a rearrangement and strengthening of mission work so that we will be prepared to offer opportunities for happy and useful service to the nine clergymen who are serving as Chaplains in the Army and Navy, when peace comes and they return to take up their rightful place in our diocesan family.

There are dangerous, difficult and, please God, glorious days ahead of us as Christians and as a Church, and surely the time demands a reconsecration of all of our powers to the service of God. Our soldiers and sailors and airmen, our sons and daughters who are representing us in this mighty struggle for the preservation of a decent world, must find God in our churches and in our lives when they come home. They must find us ready, willing and able to help them to adjust themselves to a life that has meaning and purpose and power. We do not have to rebuild bombed churches but we do have to revitalize congregations. We do have to light the fire of zeal and warm our churches with the spirit of the living God in human

hearts. Few of us have suffered materially since this war began; on the contrary many of our people have prospered greatly. If that prosperity is not to wreck our souls, we must pour our resources into the channel of God's purposes and learn to share with Him in His age-old plan for the redemption of His world.

At the close of this war, the United States will stand as the most powerful, the most influential and possibly, unless our leaders are very wise, the most feared nation in all the earth. The Church of the Living God must play its fine, constructive part in seeing that the power of our nation shall be beneficent and that its mighty influences shall be exerted for the good of the world.

There is truly a great day ahead for men who sense their responsibilities as sons of God, for men who believe that the program of Jesus is the only foundation on which we can build a decent world.

We are confident that victory will come to the Allied armies—we will rejoice and be glad some fine morning when the news of peace flashes around the world, but the glad news will be of no avail unless we win the victory over all that hinders us from godly union and concord in the years that lie ahead. We cannot live happily or according to the plan of God in a world dominated by fear and hate.

Adjustments will have to be made by force of arms. The world will have to be policed until the bitterness engendered by war is over, and rebellious men learn the art of living in harmony with their neighbors across the border, but our vision and purpose as a Church and a nation must go far beyond sanctions and compulsory boundaries and enforced payment for grievous damages.

Our vision must be the vision of a new world wherein righteousness shall be perfectly at home—a world of men of one blood, heirs of a common heritage, united in a common task, brothers in spite of race or clime because the vision of Jesus has been realized in the world-wide acceptance of the sovereignty of the God and Father of us all.

To the building of such a world may we, the followers of the Lord Christ, dedicate ourselves today.

APPENDIX "C"

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA

Right Reverend Father in God:

The 1943 report of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of East Carolina is respectfully submitted to you and the Diocesan Convention. In spite of our Diocese having been shaken by the world-wide tragedies, the work of our women in all departments has not waned, rather it has grown in strength and ability. Following the plans of the Forward in Service, our Manual has furnished the Auxiliaries with an extensive scope of work.

A departmental report will no doubt give the clearest picture in the least space.

Educational Department

Of the sixty-six Auxiliaries on the mailing list, only one has failed to send in a report of their educational Ten report that they have done no educational work because four of these hold no meetings, two prefer war work, and the size and set-up of the other four are not conducive to study at the present time. there are fifty-five women's groups in East Carolina who are doing something in the way of Christian Education. Of these, forty-eight Auxiliaries have made the study of the Holy Communion while two more are taking it up right away, which will bring the total to fifty. Thirty-four Auxiliaries have studied Latin America; seventeen, Race Relations; twenty-one, Christian Family Life; and sixteen A Just and Durable Peace. Forty-one report having had programs on the departmental work. The most encouraging thing about the reports is that seven Auxiliaries, that have not customarily had educational chairmen in the past, now have one for 1944.

Supply Department

This department filled the allotment from the national office, and additional allotments to the Good Samaritan Hospital, and for San Pablo and San Juan Mission in Phoenix, Arizona. The resolutions adopted at the Triennial Meeting in Cleveland will alter the type of supply work in the future, we will fill no more personal supply boxes to active missionary clergy, and we are trying to have their salaries made adequate to their needs. However, there is no change in boxes to missions and other institutions—they will still need our help.

Christian Social Relations Department

The work of the Department of Christian Social Relations during the past year has advanced in interest and activity. Besides carrying on our usual program, studying social problems, visiting the sick and needy, the hospitals, jails and county homes, and cooperating with all social agencies, this department has given splendid cooperation to the Red Cross, local civilian defense councils and other civic agencies, in providing for the social, moral and religious welfare of our young men and women in the armed forces.

Gifts from the department during the past year amounted to \$2,184.30. \$637.82 of this went to the Thompson Orphanage. 2,654 used garments were given to needy persons. Three auxiliaries report carrying a share of Building & Loan to be given a child at the Orphanage.

United Thank Offering

The United Thank Offering has gone forward steadily for the past three years in our diocese as in the nation. Our largest offering was presented in Cleveland, and for the past three years an offering has been sent in by every custodian both for spring and fall.

The scope of the United Thank Offering has widened greatly since it was first presented in 1889, and now in-

cludes the training, support and equipment of about 200 women missionaries, the establishment of the Ida W. Soule pension fund for them, the erection and repair of buildings in mission fields, and certain special gifts from time to time, such as the \$50.00 given from the 1940 offering for relief of missions supported by British and European churches.

In a service of majestic solemnity and beauty, the women of the church presented their Thank Offering of \$1,119,878.91, the largest in the history of the offering, at the altar of Cleveland's Trinity Cathedral. More than 1,500 women, clergy and laymen were present at this service, which for the first time since 1928 was held in a church. At recent Triennials the large number of delegates and visitors made it necessary to use a hall larger than any church available.

Church Periodical Club

The work of the Church Periodical Club goes steadily on, touching more and more lives. There seems to be an ever increasing interest in this work, and this is due to the zeal and efforts of the parish secretaries. There has been a great increase in the number of new subscriptions sent. It warms my heart to think of the lonely people who have been cheered and whose lives are brighter.

Our most outstanding work in 1943 is our service to the brave men and women within our diocese, and outside too, who are in our armed forces, to the Chaplains, and to those loyal clergy who, on the home front are so ably doing their bit. We have kept a great many service men's reading rooms and recreation centers well supplied with reading material of all kinds, and with games and puzzles.

Promotional Department

During the year 1943 this department of the Woman's Auxiliary has contributed an average of 5 to 6 articles each month to "The Mission Herald," our diocesan mag-

azine. These articles have been in the form of "Parish News Letters," "Educational Features" and "Promotional Material"—all aimed towards the promotion of women's work in the church in this diocese.

Quite a satisfactory increase in the number of subscriptions to The Mission Herald has been attributed to the work of this department in cooperation with parish promotion chairmen in the diocese.

Ten addresses, by request, have been given on the work and program of the Woman's Auxiliary. These addresses were widely scattered throughout the diocese.

Extensive work and publicity was done in behalf of the Camp Leach Adult Conference.

We urgently request that every clergyman read the reports of each of the departments as published in the Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary of this diocese for his own edification. Justice cannot be done to the excellent work of our departmental chairmen in such a brief report as this of necessity must be.

In generalizing the financial report it may be stated that the Auxiliary in this diocese has a budget of \$2,400 which is raised through an apportionment. The contributions for the year 1943 amount to:

APPENDIX "E"

MEETINGS OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

OCTOBER 19, 1943

The Executive Council of the Diocese met in St. James' Parish House, Wilmington, N. C. at 10:30 A. M., October 19, 1943, and was opened with prayer by the Bishop.

Present: Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D.; Rev. Walter R. Noe, Rev. Mortimet Glover, Rev. Alexander Miller, Mrs. Louis J. Poisson, Rev. E. F. Moseley, Rev. Jack R. Rountree, William deR. Holt, Rev. John R. Tolar, Mrs. Baxter Moore. The Rev. John C. Grainger, Vice-chairman of the Youth Department and Mrs. W. O. S. Sutherland, president-elect of the Woman's Auxiliary, were also present.

The Bishop reported that he had appointed the Rev. Lewis F. Schenck Vice-chairman of the Department of Christian Social Relations.

On motion of the Rev. Alexander Miller the members of the Executive Council stood and sung the Doxology in thanksgiving for Bishop Darst's recovery from sickness.

The Rev. E. F. Moseley, Chairman, presented the report of the new Camp Leach Committee and the Committee was given permission to make an appeal for \$5000.00 for necessary improvements to Camp Leach.

The Rev. John R. Tolar, Chairman, and the Rev. Mortimer Glover, Chairman of a sub-committee of the Finance Department, presented a new apportionment plan for the Diocese, which was approved. The recommendations, which were adopted may be found elsewhere in this paper. The Finance Department was requested to present this plan with all the details to the parishes and missions in preparation for the Every Member Canvas.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

REV. THOMAS P. NOE, Wilmington, N. C.

The year was a very happy one for me and I am glad that I have been privileged to serve in the Diocese during this period, when we are all under strain and pressure. My own health has seemed almost perfect, without the loss of a day from sickness and I have ministered at 20 different points within the Diocese, with the following services: Morning Prayer, 29; Evening Prayer, 25; Holy Communion, 26; Baptisms, 9; Weddings, 4; Funerals, 2, and I took part in one Ordination Service; and in Spartanburg, S. C., I baptized one baby for a former member of the Church Orpinanage.

Sweet Friends: My official acts for 1943 consisted of four services held at the request of the Bishop. I have been holding a service nearly every Sunday in 1944.

I have been transferred to the Diocese of Florida, as I live in that Diocese. I say bye, bye to all of my good friends up there. It was a joy to serve with you for some years, and especially to be under darling Bishop Darst.

REV. JOHN HARTLEY, Ph. D., Kinston, N. C. My Dear Mr. Noe:

I am in receipt of your notification in re Convention of East Carolina Diocese called to assemble on May 17, 1944.

I also note that clargymen of the Diocese should report to the Bishop, through the Secretary of the Convention, all of his official acts for the year 1943. So far, so good, my good Brother Noe, but I shall be unable to attend, nor have I any official acts to report. As was reported a year ago, the state of my health forbids any considerable activity. Very seldom do I venture beyond my own garden gate.

My Dear Bishop:

My present writing reports service with two churches in Virginia—St. James, Portsmouth, and St. Mark's, Suffolk.

My service here began on Whitsunday a year ago. I was asked to serve by reason of the illness of the minister, who has since entered into Rest.

During this time I have held 160 services including special "Missions" during Lent. I have baptized three infants and one adult; prepared and presented for confirmation 11 persons — 9 adults and 2 children. Celebrated the Holy Communion 52 times, with 1640 Communions.

(These figures are for both churches.) There was also the performance of one marriage ceremony at my home.

I have delivered several addresses of a religious or educational character at the invitation of separated brethren, including one address to the Ministerial Union, festered by a most praiseworthy group of Baptist brethren, working in Northampton, Hertford and Bertie Counties.

During the past year I have preached 26 times at St. Paul's Church and St. Jude's, Aurora, and the State Institution. I have baptized 5 persons and celebrated Holy Communion 9 times, a good many services in the sick room. Our Heavenly Father has wonderfully blessed me, as I was on the 23rd of April 72 years old.



# EXTRACTS FROM CANONS OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION

#### CANON 43

#### OF THE DUE CELEBRATION OF SUNDAYS

All persons within this church shall celebrate and keep the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, by regular participation in the public worship of the Church, by hearing the Word of God read and taught, and by other acts of devotion and works of charity, using all godly and sober conversation.

#### CANON 44, SECTION 1

#### OF REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE LATTY

Section 1. A communicant in good standing removing from one parish or congregation to another shall be entitled to receive and shall procure from the Rector or Minister of the parish or congregation of his or her last residence, or if there be no Rector or Minister, from one of the Wardens, a certificate stating that he or she is duly registered or enrolled as communicant in the parish or congregation from which he or she desires to be transferred and the Rector or Minister or Warden of the parish or congregation to which such communicant may remove, shall enroll him or her as a communicant when such certificate is presented, or, on failure to procure such certificate through no fault of such communicant, upon other evidence of his or her being such a communicant sufficient in the judgment of the Rector or Minister. Notice of such enrollment in such parish or congregation to which such communicant shall have removed, shall be sent by the Rector or the Minister thereof to the Rector of the parish from which the communicant is removed.

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

### **JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS, CONVENTION OF 1945**

New Bern, N. C., May 23, 1945.

The Sixty-second Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of East Carolina met in Christ Church, New Bern, N. C., Wednesday, May 23, 1945.

At 9:30 A. M., the Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Stephen Gardner, the Rev. C. E. Williams, the Rev. E. W. Halleck and the Rev. Walter R. Noe. At this service the Rev. E. W. Halleck presented to the Bishop a pastoral staff in memory of Mr. Thomas F. Darden, Junior Warden of St. John's, Wilmington, for twenty-seven years and a trustee of the Diocese of East Carolina for nine years. This staff was receight by the Bishop for the Diocese.

At 10:00 A. M., the Convention met for organization, The Secretary called the roll, and 38 clergymen, 36 parishes and 11 missions responded as follows:

A quorum being present, the Convention re-elected the Rev. Walter R. Noe as Secretary.

The regular Committees were appointed by the Bishop.

The Bishop nominated Mr. George B. Elliott as Chancellor of the Diocese for the remainder of Bishop Darst's active service, and the Rev. Stephen Gardner moved confirmation. Adopted.

The Rev. Charles E. Williams moved that the sessions of the Convention be as outlined in the program.

The Bishop presented the statistical part of his report. (See Appendix "A").

Mr. H. Edmund Rodgers for the Committee on Canons, offered the following amendments to the Canons, which were adopted.

#### DIOCESAN CONVENTION AT NEW BERN, 1945

The Committee on Canons reports as follows:

1. Amend Canon 9, Section 1, Subsection 3, after the word Diocese in the first sentence by adding a new sentence,

"The term of office of the six Clergymen and six Laymen shall be four years, and they shall not be elegible

for re-election until a period of one year shall have elapsed."

The purpose of this change is to secure rotation of office and have new men serving from time to time, with the privilege of re-election of men found valuable in the work of the Executive Council. A period of four years will allow time for a member to become acquainted with all committees and their work and to attend from one to two General Conventions of the Church.

2. Amend Canon 12, Section 2, by adding at the end thereof, "Whenever title to real property is vested in the Trustees for the benefit of any Mission, or other organization of the Diocese, other than a Parish, the said Trustees shall have the power to convey the said property upon written request and approval of the Bishop, or the Ecclesiastical Authority, and upon like request shall have power to convey the property and reinvest the proceeds in other property, such reinvestment to be held in trust for the benefit of such Mission or other organization."

The purpose is to provide a method of conveyance of property held by the Trustees for organizations other than a Parish, and clears the way for legal search of title by lawyers and approval of the chain of title and conveyances.

3. Amend Canon 23, Section 1, by changing the period at the end of the word "annum" to a comma and adding,

"In which sum shall be included all income received from the Bishop Watson Fund for the support of the Episcopate."

This amendment was suggested by the Rev. John R. Tolar, Chairman of the Finance Department. The purpose is to make the salary a definite sum of Six Thousand Dollars in all, and not Six Thousand Dollars with the right of the Bishop to take also the income of said fund as is now the case. Bishop Darst has never taken this said income.

The Rt. Rev. John J. Gravatt, D. D., Bishop of Upper South Carolina, had noonday prayers and made an address.

Mrs. James G. Staton of Williamston presented to Bishop Darst a book of remembrance containing letters written by many people throughout the Diocese. The Rev. Alexander Miller, Chairman of the Diocesan Anniversary Committee, presented to him a generous check, a gift of the people of the Diocese.

The Rev. John R. Tolar, Chairman of the Department of Finance, presented the report of his Department, which was adopted, as follows:

# REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE TO THE ANNUAL CONVENTION OF 1945

Rt. Rev. Father in God,

Gentlemen of the Convention:

The time of this Convention is necessarily short, with two great thoughts occupying our minds—sorrow too great to be adequately expressed because our beloved and truly great Bishop is relinquishing his leadership, and the important business of electing his successor. The report of the Department of Finance will therefore be the shortest in its history.

The year just closed was thoroughly satisfactory from a financial standpoint and we congratulate and thank the several parishes and missions for their splendid cooperation and response to the program laid before them and adopted at our last Convention. Your Department sees no reason to change that program for the coming year. We recommend that the same quotas which were suggested last year be continued, and that those places which could not, or did not reach them last year—and they are few—continue their efforts to reach the desired

goal. Not only did we close the year with all bills paid and with the General Church and other quotas met. We also had at the close of the year a substantial balance in the bank. This balance was not due to the fact that our quotas were too large but because so many places paid the amounts asked of them. In addition to all this every cent of the former diocesan debt has been paid, thanks to the continuing efforts of Mr. Gaither's Committee, and we are now debt free. We express our grateful thanks to this committee. They have done a hard job well through faith and persistent effort.

The Auditor's Report for the year ending December 31, 1944, shows that our cash balance at the beginning of the year was \$5,609.28; that total receipts for the year for all purposes budgeted and otherwise, were \$78,404.34, making total available funds \$84,013.62. Our total disbursements for the year were \$75,055.03, leaving a balance in Bank January 1st of this year of \$8,958.59. For details, see Treasurer's Report.

Before the election of a new Bishop there is an important detail in regard to his salary which should be cleared up. Canon simply fixes his salary at \$6,000.00 but the Bishop Watson Fund was left to the Diocese for the support of the Episcopate, the net income to be paid to the Bishop as it shall accrue. As the Canon now stands, a Bishop, under the terms of Bishop Watson's will, can claim the income from the fund in addition to his salary. Bishop Darst has always recognized this. In the Journal for 1930, page 53, we find: "The Bishop made a report on the Bishop Watson Fund and stated that the income would be returned by him to the fund of the Diocese for the support of the Episcopate." Your Department therefore urges that the Canon fixing the salary of the Bishop be amended to read: "The salary of the Bishop shall be \$6,000.00 in which sum shall be included all income received from the Bishop Watson Fund", This would clear up any future possibility of misunderstanding.

Our Bishop is retiring on a pension of less than \$1,500.00 and, in discussing the matter with his clergy at Kinston, he stated frankly that it would be impossible for him to live on that amount, and it was then agreed that the Diocese would supplment this pension by an addition of \$1,500.00 a year during his lifetime. The Department recommends that this agreement be ratified by this Convention. Let me say that the amount has already been taken care of by the agreement of almost every parish and mission in the Diocese to pay a stated sum annually over and above their accepted apportionments for the support of the Diocese and the General Church. The response to the letter of the Department setting out the plan was prompt and enthusiastic and the Treasurer has filed in Wilmington pledges amounting to \$1,635.00. This action on the part of the parishes and missions is a token of their love and appreciation of what the Bishop has meant and still means to this Diocese.

The Rev. Walter R. Noe, Treasurer, presented his report which was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Convention then took a recess.

At 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, an anniversary meeting of the laymen of the Diocese was held, with Mr. Champion McD. Davis presiding. Addresses were made by Mr. Robert Strange, Mr. Junius D. Grimes and Mr. William

B. Campbell. The Anniversary Address was made by the Hon. J. C. B. Ehringhaus.

At the suggestion of the Bishop, the delegates to the Synod elected in 1944 were made the delegates in 1945 for a meeting of the Synod, if held.

On motion of the Rev. John R. Tolar, Chairman of the Department of Finance, the Treasurer's report was approved and the Rev. Walter R. Noe was re-elected Treasurer. See Appendix "B."

The following amendment to the Constitution offered by the Chairman of the Committee on Canons was passed on its first reading:

"Amend the Constitution by amending Article 13 by adding a sentence at the end of said article as follows: "That all clergymen who have been retired on account of age or disability, are entitled to a seat and a vote in the Diocesan Convention, but their absence at any Convention shall not be counted in determining a constitutional majority."

A report on the work being done by our Church at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, N. C., was made by the Rev. R. E. Gribbin, Jr., Associate Rector and Student Chaplain.

The following resolution offered by the Rev. Stephen Gardner was adopted:

"That in the Treasurer's Report for 1945, there be included under the title 'Church School Service Program' the amounts given by the children of each parish and mission through the Lenten Mite Box Offering."

The report of the Standing Committee was read by the Rev. Charles E. Williams, as follows:

# THE REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA FOR THE CONVENTION YEAR 1944 - 1945

The Sixty-first Annual Convention of the Diocese, meeting in St. Peter's Church, Washington, N. C. May 17, 1944, elected the following to be members of the Standing Committee for the ensuing year:

The Reverend Jack R. Rountree, the Reverend Stephen Gardner, the Reverend Charles E. Williams, Mr. William Dunn and Mr. John G. Bragaw.

On the call of the retiring president, a meeting of the Standing Committee was held in the parish house of St. Peter's Church, Washington, N. C., May 17, 1944, for the purpose of organization. Upon the motion of the Reverend Stephen Gardner, the Reverend Charles E. Williams was elected President. Upon motion of Mr. John G. Bragaw, the Reverend Stephen Gardner was elected Vice President. Upon motion of the Reverend Jack R. Rountree, Mr. John G. Bragaw was elected Secretary of the Committee.

Your Committee has held eight meetings during the year with a splendid attendance in spite of the gasoline shortage, and much interest has been shown by each member.

The Reverend Cecil Locke Alligood was recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests.

The consent of the Committee was given to the election of the Reverend Reginald Mallette to be Bishop of the Diocese of Northern Indiana.

The application of Mr. Foster Nugent Cox to be admitted a candidate for Holy Orders was approved, and he was recomnended to the Bishop.

The Committee approved the dates of May 23-24 as the proper dates for the Annual Convention to be held in Christ Church, New Bern, N. C.

At the December meeting of the Standing Committee, Bishop Thomas C. Darst, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese of East Carolina, met with the Committee and informed us of his intention to resign when the House of Bishops met in Birmingham, Ala., in January 1945. This statement from the Bishop was received with deep regret, and the Reverend Jack R. Rountree presented the following resolution which was unanimously adopted by the Committee:

The Standing Committee receives with profound regret the notification of the Right Reverend Thomas C. Darst, D. D., of his intention to present his resignation as Bishop of the Diocese of East Carolina at the January 1945 session of the House of Bishops. We feel that his retirement will be a great loss to the Diocese, to the leadership and service of which he has given such a high spiritual inspiration, and in which he has literally worn himself out. We assure him of our loyalty, devotion and deep interest in his welfare. May the Lord give him continual and improving health, and many years of life

among those who love him and those whom he loves."

Mr. Foster Nugent Cox was recommended to the Bishop for Ordination to the Diaconate, shortening his probationary period as a candidate for Holy Orders.

The consent of the Committee was given to the Diocese of Albany for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor.

The consent of the Committee was given to the Diocese of Texas for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor.

The consent of the Committee was given to the election of the Very Reverend Reginald Heber Gooden to be Missionary Bishop of the Panama Canal Zone.

The consent of the Committee was given to the election of the Reverend Conrad Herbert Gesner to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Missionary District of South Dakota.

The consent of the Committee was given to the election of the Venerable Bravid Washington Harris to be Bishop of the Missionary District of Liberia.

The consent of the Committee was given to the election of the Reverend Donald Bradshaw Aldrich, D. D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Michigan.

The permission of the Committee was given to the Diocese of South Florida for the election of a Bishop Suffragan.

The consent of the Standing Committee was given to the election of the Reverend Henry Irving Louttit, B. N. B. D., to be Suffragan Bishop of South Florida.

The Reverend Joseph Strange Huske was recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese for Ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests.

Your Standing Committee has requested our Bishop, the Right Reverend Thomas C. Darst, D. D., to remain as the active Bishop of our Diocese until his successor has been duly elected and consecrated. The Right Reverent Thomas C. Darst, D. D., has been requested by your Standing Committee to preside at the Diocesan Convention to be held in Christ Church, New Bern, N. C., May 23 - 24, 1945, and in the election of a Bishop give such assistance as he shall deem necessary.

The consent of the Committee was given to the election of the Rev. Fraderick Lehrle Barry, D. D., to be the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Albany.

The permission of the Committee was given to the Diocese of Pennsylvania to elect a Bishop Suffragan.

The consent of the Committeeo was given to the election of the Reverend Charles Avery Mason, S. T. D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Dallas.

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The consent of the Committee was given to the Diocese of Connecticut to elect a Bishop Coadjutor.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINING CHAPLAINS FOR THE YEAR 1944

This report is presented as required by Canon 6, Section 4 of the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention.

Wilmington, April 20: The Rev. Joseph Strange Huske, Jr., Candidate for Holy Orders, completed in a satisfactory manner the subjects required for Deacon's Orders under Canon 4, Section 2.

Wilmington, September 18: Mr. Foster Nugent Cox. Postulant, presented satisfactory evidence that he had completed the requirements under Canon 2, Section V, sub-section II for admission as a candidate for Holy Orders.

The above examinations were held in Wilmington with the Rev. E. W. Halleck, the Rev. T. P. Noe and the Rev. Alexander Miller, examiners. All reports and recommendations were presented to the Bishop of the Diocese in the order and form required by Canon.

The Bishop re-appointed the Board of Examining Chaplains, as follows: Rev. Alexander Miller, Rev. E. W. Halleck, Rev. T. P. Noe, Rev. E. T. Jillson, Rev. E. F. Moseley.

The applications of St. Anne's, Jacksonville and St. Thomas', Ahoskie, to be admitted as new parishes, were approved.

The Church Pension Fund Report was read by Mr. McCullough B. Wilson, as follows:

#### REPORT OF THE CHURCH PENSION FUND COMMITTEE

Your Committee submits as a part of its report, a statement sent us by the Church Pension Fund and asks that it be printed in the Journal.

Since the meeting of the Convention in 1944, the assessments of the parishes and missions have been paid fairly regularly. At the end of the year only one parish had unpaid assessments and they have been paid since that time.

Six of our parishes have cleared up back pension assessments and one parish is making regular payments on arrearages.

The total amount collected since the last report of this Committee, including interest, is \$4,899.36.

The Committee is working closely with the National Office of the Church Pension Fund to clear up all of the arrearages at the earliest possible date.

#### THE CHURCH PENSION FUND

New York, N. Y., April 27, 1945.

My Dear Mr. Noe:

I am writing to you prior to your Annual Convention to offer the following comments which might form the basis for a brief, informal report on the administration of the Church Pension Fund:

The present pension roll of the Fund is at the rate of a little less than \$1,400.000.00 a year. Since the fund started it has paid out about \$25,000.000.00 in pension benefits. It is always of interest to know what pensions are now being paid in each Diocese and Missionary District, and I am therefore enclosing a list of the present beneficiaries in the Diocese of East Carolina.

It may also be of interest to know that although your total pension roll now amounts to \$9,324.00 per annum, the total pension assessments payable by parishes, missions and other ecclesiastical organizations within your Diocese amount to about \$5,000.00 per annum.

Again I can report that the record of pension assessments throughout the Church is almost perfect. The total paid in 1944 was just over \$1,192,000.00, which is a new record. The largest previous total was \$1,176,00 in 1931. More striking, however, is the fact that the arrears in pension assessments are less than at any time in the fund's twenty-seven years of existence. In that period pension assessments totaling over \$27,600,000.00 have been collected by the Fund, whereas the total unpaid balance for this entire period, due from parishes, missions or other ecclesiastical organizations throughout the Church, is only about \$50,000.00, or less then one-fifth of one per cent. The pension assessments are the life blood of the system and the Trustees are deeply appreciative of the splendid manner in which the Church has so faithfully discharged this obligation.

The present assets of the Fund amount to approximately \$39,000,000.00 and the Fund's investments have a market value of over \$2,000,000.00 in excess of their book value. There is not a single investment of the Fund which is in default as to interest. The investment problem, however, is constantly becoming more difficult, particularly the problem of securing an adequate return without sacrificing quality.

Because of this latter difficulty, which is the result of influences beyond our control, the Trustees have directed a revaluation of the Fund's actual reserve liabilities on a 3¼ per cent basis instead of the previous interest assumption of 3¼ per cent. This required the use of approximately \$2,000,000.00 of what had previously been considered surplus. It still leaves a reasonable excess of assets over liabilities, but it is possible that a more drastic reduction in the interest basis of the Fund may later have to be undertaken with the possibility also that the assessment rate may have to be increased. A further study of this problem will be made before the meeting of the General Convention in 1946, at which time it may be necessary, depending on the circumstances, for us to make a report on the subject. The action taken so far, however, appears to be sufficient for the time being and places the Fund in a stronger position.

The Fund's wholly-owned subsidiaries, namely, The Church Hymnal Corporation, the Church Life Insurance Corporation and the Church Properties Fire Insurance Corporation, seem to be flourishing. They are each accomplishing much in the interests of the Church and are valuable assets of the Church Pension Fund.

These few comments are, of course, only very brief and I should be glad to supply you with any additional information

which you may want. In sending this letter to you, I am particularly glad of the opportunity again of expressing to you, personally and in behalf of the Trustees, my grateful appreciation of the assistance which you and others have given us in the administration of this great organization of the Church. I hope that we may count on your continued support.

Report of Committee on the State of the Church

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A report on the Army and Navy work was presented by the Chairman of Diocesan Committee on Army and Navy Work.

In the evening another Anniversary service was held with the sermon by the Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, D. D., Presiding Bishop, and an address by the Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D.

#### SECOND DAY

Thursday, May 24, 1945.

The second day of the Convention was devoted to the election of a Bishop and other matters that could not be finished on the first day.

The Rev. Stephen Gardner celebrated Holy Communion at 9:30 A. M.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Church was read by its Chairman, the Rev. William B. Daniels, Jr., as follows:

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

The Committee on the State of the Church submits the following report:

#### **Statistics**

On the basis of available figures we find that in the Diocese during 1944 there were 273 baptisms compared to 266 for the previous year; 115 marriages compared to 152; 266 burials compared to 135; 381 confirmations compared to 252. The total number of communicants in the Diocese is 8,122 compared to 7,896 for the previous year.

#### **Finances**

The year 1944 was marked by a steady increase in giving for the support of the Church in all phases of her financial life. Payments on apportionments by parishes and missions amounted Report of Committee on the State of the Church

to \$43,329.23, an increase of nearly 5,000.00 over the year 1943. The General Church quota of \$8,000.00 was paid in full. Offerings for Thompson Orphanage increased approximately 30 per cent over the previous year. Increases were also shown in the incomes of parishes and missions for their own work.

Our chief financial enemy, the Diocesan debt, has surrendered unconditionally. Two years ago the amount of this debt was \$11,683.44. To Mr. W. G. Gaither of Elizabeth City and his committee of laymen, we give our heart felt gratitude for their untiring efforts in the retirement of this debt. With this statement announcing the retirement of the indebtedness of the Diocese, there should be included a word of warning against future debts. The only way to avoid a recurrence is for each parish and mission to realize the importance of paying their apportionments in full, as the work of the Diocese is bound only by the limitations of the parishes and missions within it. Each clergy and delegate is urged to take home a new sense of responsibility in regard to this important matter.

#### Convocation of Colored Church Workers

There are seventeen parishes and missions in the Convocation with 1063 communicants served by the Archdeacon and four other priests. During the year two valuable men have been lost to the work. There is one small parochial school at Washington. One parish, St. Mark's, Wilmington, is definitely self-supporting. Two others are potentially so. A new Church building, St. Thomas', Sladesville, has been completed, and the erection of another at Farmville is about to begin. Some work has been done on the resurrection of the mission at Williamston. During the shortage of clergy, invaluable help is being rendered by the Rev. Messrs. Gardner, Mackie and Matthews of Washington, Belhaven, Sladesville and Aurora.

#### Good Shepherd Hospital

July 1, 1945, will mark the seventh anniversary of the Good Shepherd Hospital in New Bern. Beginning with a grant of real property from Diocesan holdings valued at \$10,000.00 the hospital has increased its physical assets to the amount of \$144,000.00, without additional aid from Diocesan funds. A new wing to the hospital and a nurses' home were completed during the past year. The number of persons treated has increased steadily with 8,250 days of care being administered during 1944. Total income of the Good Shepherd hospital for the past year was nearly \$26,000.00.

#### Camp Leach

Progress has been made in the affairs of Camp Leach, the diocesan training center for adults and young people. The infantile paralysis epidemic of last summer caused curtailment of nearly half of the Camp Leach program. However, during 1944 capital improvements in excess of \$5,000.00 were made, and this work is still going forward.

#### General

Your Committee believes that the Church in the Diocese of East Carolina has taken a step forward in the past year. This is particularly true in the financial phases of our diocesan and parochial life. We are extending our work slowly, but steadily. One new church was consecrated during the year, and the Inland Waterway work continues its growth and development.

The women of the Church have increased their activities and effectiveness through the program of the Woman's Auxiliary, and general progress over previous years has been reported.

It is with a sense of profound loss that your committee contemplates the retirement of our beloved Bishop. And yet, underneath this sense of loss and sadness, there is an abiding prayer of Thanksgiving to Almighty God that in His divine wisdom He sent to the family of East Carolina this great Shepherd of Souls. His leadership, his work and living amongst us for thirty years have been a Christ-like inspiration and benediction.

The Bishop was requested to serve as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Diocese while acting as Bishof the Diocese.

A report of the Laymen's Thank Offering was made by Mr. Robert Strange, Treasurer.

Mr. Robert Strange made a report for the Trustees of the Diocese. (See Appendix "D".)

The Ven. R. I. Johnson read the reports of the Good Shepherd Hospital and the Archdeacon of Colored Work, as follows:

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT GOOD SHEPHERD HOSPITAL

Rt. Rev. Bishop and members of the Convention:

On July 1 we shall have completed seven years of operation of the Good Shepherd Hospital. These years have been fruitful in ever widening services to an increasing number of people and in a growing appreciation of what the Church has done in establishing and maintaining this agency of helpfulness in one of the most vital needs of the colored people.

In 1939 our patients came from four counties; in 1944 from ten counties. We employed four graduate nurses in 1939, eight in 1944. Total employes in 1939 were 13; in 1944, 19. Days of care in 1939 were 3242; in 1944, 8250. Income in 1939 was \$14,085.95; in 1944, \$25,818.95.

The new Federal Works wing adds 25 beds. The total beds now available is 55. Occupancy swings from 20 to 30 most of the time with occasional spurts to a higher figure. A fine new nurses' home erected by Federal Works is now complete and makes an attractive and useful addition to our facilities. For the doing of our work, we are now very well equipped. Other facilities such as sterilization and X-ray, are ample for the operation of the hospital at full capacity. The bi-racial professional teams which have served us from the beginning are still with us. Drs. Fisher and Wadsworth; Drs. Kafer and Mann; Drs. Duffey and Martin. We are increasingly grateful through the years to these gentlemen whose cordiality and skill have made it possible for us to have a hospital. It should be noted that although the population of New Bern has doubled since we started the Good Shepherd hospital, there has been no increase

of doctors in the city. Demands upon these men are terrific. Any cracking in their number would be an irreparable blow to our work. It is our constant prayer that they may continue well and active for the sake of the thousands who await their healing touch. It is a physical impossibility for these few men to fill Good Shepherd Hospital to its capacity. No efforts thus far have been successful in securing either an intern or a resident. Until such has been accomplished there will be inevitable defects in the matter of certain types of records and emergency care and clinical services.

Although income has steadily increased, also have burdens in costs and wages. Practically everyone in our employ except executive officers, has had his pay doubled in the last two and a half years.

As a sidelight on the people's increased ability to pay their way, it should be noted that of \$25,819.95 taken in 1944, patients paid \$22,235.59. The balance came from the County of Craven, the City of New Bern and Duke Endowment, initial project financing by the Federal Government and donations.

During the year we were made a Penicillin Depot through the assistance of Dr. Batham, Dr. Bynum and Congressman Barden. As a result hundreds have received the beneficent healing of this wonder drug.

Bishop Darst and our Trustees, headed by Mr. Noe, have been constant in their solicitude for us and guidance in intricate matters of business and promotion, without which the administrator would be helpless. Present Trustees are: Bishop Darst, the Rev. Mr. Noe, Chairman; Rev. C. E. Williams, Rev. Stephen Gardner, Ven. R. I. Johnson; Messrs. E. K. Bishop, Vice Chairman; William Dunn, John Dunn, W. C. Chadwick, I. H. Smith and J. T. Barber; and Mesdames John D. Whitford and R. N. Duffy.

This report could not be completed without recording our gratitude to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of East Carolina, first under Mrs. Poisson and now under Mrs. Sutherland, for the invaluable help given each year in contributions of supplies and money which has saved us hundreds of dollars. They have treated us with special favor for which we are proud and grateful. The National Supply Department also helps us year after year with linens and surgical supplies.

In closing, may we say to our good Bishop that he may be assured that we shall remember him with thanksgiving as we attempt to carry on in the coming years.

#### REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON OF COLORED WORK

On the whole, life in the parishes and missons of the Colored Convocations is good and the outlook, given certain prerequisites, is bright. About an eighth of the communicants are colored and normally through the years about one-tenth of the Confirmations have been colored people. The properties are in the best condition for many years. The beautiful new church at Sladesville was finished before Mr. Gibson left us and work should begin in a very few days on the new building at Farmville. Such is the people's faith in the erection of their building that they are planning to entertain this year's Convocation in it. We shall try not to fail them.

We received serious setbacks this year in the loss of two young men, who meant a great deal to us for future development in this field. The Rev. Mr. Gibson felt constrained to accept a call to Hampton, Va., where he will certainly have a fine cutlet for his brilliant talents both in the city and at Hampton Today we need two men in mission groups where we can least afford to be without them because of new ventures in them. Just now the Archdeacon is under a deep debt of gratitude to neighboring white clergy, who at the request of Bishop Darst are giving services in the Convocation: The Rev. Mr. Gardner at St. Paul's, Washington; the Rev. Mr. Mackie at St. Mary's, Belhaven and St. Thomas', Sladesville; and the Rev. Mr. Matthews at St. Jude's, Aurora, and the Rev. J. B. Brown at Haddock's Cross Roads. The Rev. Mr. Noe, who knows this field as well as any of us, is in constant touch with it, helping to iron out its difficulties.

As our Bishop goes into retirement we shall remember that he has given great encouragement to this field. A parish house and three churches have been erected in his time; the number of clergy has been ample through the years; salaries have been greatly augmented; the giving of the people has been strikingly increased; the Good Shepherd Hospital has been erected and operated. The mood of the people is ready for an evangelistic advance and I trust that we may be worthy and able to meet it with all the gracious agencies of truth and power which the Church so richly offers.

The Annual Report of St. Mary's School and Junior College was presented as follows:

# ANNUAL REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL RALEIGH. N. C.

In accordance with provisions of the Act of Incorporation, the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith a report of financial conditions as of the close of the academic year 1943 - '44, and of important action taken by the Board since the last Diocesan Convention.

The following meetings of the Board of Trustees, its Executive and Finance Committees have been held:

Annual meeting of Board of Trustees October 4, 1944.

Executive Committee Meetings: June 22, 1944; September 6, 1944; November 28, 1944; February 13, 1945.

Finance Committee Meetings: September 27, 1944; November 20, 1944; February 13, 1945.

At these meetings the following important matters were considered and acted upon:

- 1. Welcome to membership of Board: Mr. J. C. B. Ehringhaus, Diocese of North Carolina; Rev. James McDowell Dick, Diocese of North Carolina; Mr. Wm. H. Ruffin, Diocese of North Carolina; Rev. James F. Ferneyhough, Diocese of East Carolina; Mr. J. E. Powe, Diocese of South Carolina; Rev. Richard C. Patton, Diocese of South Carolina.
- 2. Elected, Wm. H. Ruffin and Rev. James McDowell Dick, members of Executive Committee to fill vacancies by Mr. Richard H. Lewis and Rev. John A. Wright, respectively.
  - 3. Accepted reports of School Officers.
- 4. Elected E. F. Stoughton Trustee of Annuity Fund and member of Pension Committee, succeeding A. W. Tucker.
- 5. Increased annual allocation to Annuity Fund from \$5,000.00 to \$6,500.00.
- 6. Allocated to Annuity Fund corpus proceeds from sale of stock, \$3,950.75, a bequest of Mrs. Addie S. Cox.
- 7. Authorized expenditure for alterations, maintenance and summer operation of approximately \$17,000.00.
- 8. Authorized additional payment on mortgage of \$3,750.00 reducing balance to \$8,625.00.
- 9. Approved cancellation of receivables from Diocese of North Carolina and Diocese of South Carolina of \$1,860.00 and \$500.00, respectively.
- 10. Authorized following increases in general charges to offset war time operating costs: Resident students from \$750.00 to \$800.00; non-resident students from \$175.00 to \$200.00.

- 11. Approved investment of approximately \$30,000.00 cash trust funds and \$50,000.00 campaign funds in U. S. Securities.
  - 12. Authorized renewal of teachers' contracts.
- 13. Paid tribute to memory of Mrs. J. W. C. Johnson, long time member of Board of Trustees.
- 14. Rejected offer by Columbia Institute in Tennessee of certain books, objects of Art and Statuary under will of Margarette Bowles.
- 15. Officially recognized the generous support in time and money of Bishop Penick, Mr. J. C. B. Ehringhaus, Mr. Clyde Dillon and Mrs. L. V. Sutton in the conduct of the Centennial Campaign.

By far the most important undertaking of the year was the promotion of the Centennial Campaign. The goal to meet the post war physical requirements of Saint Mary's School was \$350,000.00. To date \$157,000.00 has been contributed. Realizing the need for structural improvements which cannot be provided from the funds received so far and believing that additional funds can be obtained, the Executive Committee has asked the President to call a meeting of the full Board of Trustees to be held at Commencement on June 4, 1945, to devise plans for bringing the campaign to a successful conclusion.

During the 1944-'45 session the school has again operated with a capacity enrollment, 229 Resident Students, 77 non-resident students. Resident students came from 14 states: North Carolina, 142; Virginia, 29; South Carolina, 15; Georgia, 12; Florida, 13; Alabama, 1; Pennsylvania and Tennessee, 3 each; West Virginia. 2; Michigan, Oklahoma, New Jersey, Missouri, District of Columbia, 1 each.

The religious affiliations of the 229 resident students are: Episcopalian, 122; Methodist, 41; Presbyterian, 32; Baptist, 19; Christian, 4; Moravian, 2; not known, 8. Affiliation of 77 non-resident students are: Episcopalian, 23; Methodist, 17; Presbyterian, 8; Baptist, 21; Christian, Congregationalist, Greek-Catholic, 1 each; not known, 5.

A capacity enrollment of resident students for the 1945-'46 session is already assured. As of May 5, 1945, 237 resident students' applications had been accepted and 35 applicants were on the waiting list. Of the applications accepted, 105 are from returning students and 132 from girls coming to Saint Mary's for the first time.

War conditions have continued to add to the operating difficulties. The school has cooperated fully with the programs of the War Price and Rationing Board, the War Production Board,

the War Manpower Commission and the other regulatory agencies. The food and labor problems have been especially difficult. Throughout the year the student body has continued to participate actively in the "Home Front" activities. Contributions by the students and faculty to Red Cross amount to \$1,011.-00; to United War Fund, \$1,402.00. The students, faculty and staff received special recognition for an outstanding record in the purchase of War Bonds and Stamps. Total purchases were approximately \$7,500.00. Students have cooperated in collecting waste paper and old clothes and have aided in the British War Relief Association program.

A condensed statement of the financial condition of Saint Mary's School taken from the Auditor's report of June 30, 1944, is attached.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION M. D. WHISNANT, SUPERINTENDENT

Fewer applications are being received for the type of children that meet our requirements for admission due to the prosperity of our country brought about by the war. Our requirements stress need for care that cannot be given by the parents. We receive a large number of applications to board children so their parents can work. This is the type of care that we do not give as from experience we have found that the two groups do not get along well together.

During the school year 1943-'44 we had 79 children in school. All of these children were promoted to a higher grade. The principal of the Grammar School was so impressed with the improvement shown in the children's behavior and schol-

May

arship that she made a special chart of our children to compare their records with other children in the school. The results shown on the chart caused her to remark that if she took a cross section of the school population, our group would have the best record. Our one graduate, a boy from Charlotte Technical High School, won the Annual Bible Award presented by each high school to the outstanding Bible student of the year.

Due to the heavy schedule of our Chaplain, it is necessary for us to have either an early morning or afternoon service. As a group we prefer the 8:30 A. M., service, because the afternoon service breaks into the only afternoon which the children have for rest and recreation other than Saturday. Our young children attend St. Martin's Sunday School. Those above the fifth grade have a choice; they may either attend St. Martin's or St. Peter's Church. This choice divides the children about equally—all the girls go to St. Peter's and the boys to St. Martin's.

The health of our children remains above the average due to the constant cooperation received from Dr. Adams and Dr. Hipp, the official orphanage doctors, and Dr. Houser, Chairman of the Health Committee. St. Peter's Hospital Foundation pays for all our hospitalization and the children's dental work is done at the Memorial Hospital Dental Clinic.

I am convinced that our property is in the best repair that it has been in for a number of years. This has been accomplished through a program of constant repair work for the past five There remains much to be done. During the summer our boys painted the outside of four cottages, both the barns, and the little house where our fireman lives on Cecil Street. This work was supervised by F. W. McGinnis, who resigned his work on August 1. Much work was done to the gutters and downspouts on all the buildings. With the use of a bulldozer the old creek run was filled in. This improved our property and gave us the use of about half acre of land which had been inaccessable for a number of years. The floors in all of our cottages except the baby cottage were varnished during the Much work has been done to our heating system, under the supervision of W. L. Mauney, Chairman of the Properties Committee.

In 1941 we undertook to put our farm back into production. This work has progressed year by year until at the present time the farm is under full cultivation. Due to the generosity of our loyal friends, the farm has been equipped with a tractor, plow, twelve registered Jersey cows, one regis-

tered Jersey bull, and due to a normal increase, we have raised one milk cow and nine heifers. At present we have a registered Jersey herd of thirteen cows, nine heifers and one bull.

During the year 1944 we produced 8,265 gallons of milk. This gave us our milk supply, plus a surplus which was sold for \$559.02. The total value of food produced on the farm in 1944 was \$7,995.13.

In our drive for financial independence we have received enough help so that at the present time our Thanksgiving offering is being carried forward to start the new year. To me, this is as it should be. It enables us to pay our bills as we go. During the years when it was necessary to receive credit and pay these bills with the Thanksgiving Offering, we were left practically nothing with which to begin the new year.


All of us here at the orphanage would like to express our sincere appreciation to our loyal friends who have made the Orphanage an institution we can be proud of.

#### To Bishop Darst


A shepherd true! For thirty years

#### BISHOP DARST'S CLOSING ADDRESS

## Diocesan Convention, Christ Church, New Bern May 23, 1945

In closing my address at the first Diocesan Council over which I had the privilege of presiding, held in this beautiful church in May 1915, I said, "My earnest prayer is that I may be able to serve you, the Church in East Carolina, faithfully and efficiently. In order to do this, I must have Divine assistance. I must have the wisdom to Know God's will. Please ask Him to give me the necessary wisdom and grace and simplicity for the great and glorious work which he has been graciously pleased to put into my hands."

Thirty years have passed since then, thirty blessed years of service and fellowship for which I humbly thank God today.

We have gone forward through the years and the blessed part of it all is that we have gone forward together in mutual trust and confidence.

Carrying out the ideals of my beloved and saintly predecessor, Bishop Robert Strange, I am happy to feel that we have become a family of God, bound together by our trust in one another, and our loyalty to our leader, Christ.

I realize very fully as I come to the close of my active services that I have not given this beloved Diocese all that it deserved or needed, but I can say in all humility that I have given the best that I had to give. Conscious of my limitations, I have never asked God to make me a great Bishop, but I have asked Him constantly to keep me simple, to give me an understanding heart, and to

instill into my daily living some measure of his love for men.

I have not tried to force the clergy and laity to do their duty, but I have tried to lead them into those paths where duty is merged into joyful acceptance of the will of God.

Many of the dreams of thirty years ago have been fulfilled, many are still unrealized, but thank God they are not as vague and far away as they once were and I know that under the wise and loving leadership of your new bishop, the hopes and plans of yesterday will become the blessed realities of tomorrow.

May God in His wisdom guide you to the selection of one who strong in faith, warm in heart, consecrated in life, may as a true shepherd and friend, lead this Diocese to those heights of service and achievement to which God has been so lovingly calling us through all these years.

For the privilege of having served you for thirty years, and for your loyalty and friendship, for your generous appreciation of my little accomplishments, and your tender patience with my failures I thank God and I thank you today.

As you march forward with high faith and courage into the days and years of glorious opportunity that lie ahead my prayers will go with you, my heart will be with you. To all of my beloved people, those whose loving friendship has lighted all the years, those whom God has allowed me to help and comfort, those thousands upon thousands upon whose heads I have laid my hands in Confirmation, to them all I say out of a confident heart, "Pe strong and of good courage." Never falter in the good fight until the last enemy is conquered, never cease to corry your banner as a soldier and servant of Jesus Christ until self and sin are conquered, and the Kingdom for which He died and for which He lives is established in the hearts of men and nations everywhere.

To the building of a greater diocese, to the partici-

#### APPENDIX "C"

# REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE DIOCESE OF EAST CAROLINA

Rt. Rev. Father in God and Members of the Convention:

The Woman's Auxiliary respectfully reports its work for 1944-1945 to the Diocesan Convention. I wish this could be a full and complete report of the two Convocational Presidents and of the Departmental Chairmen just as they were prepared for the Annual Auxiliary Meeting.

Our two Convocational Presidents are also Chairmen of Missions and Church Extension and they have been untiring in their work. Through special gifts the women have given to: The Presiding Bishop's Fund, Cancer Control, cards and gifts for service men, the campaign for St. Mary's School, lamps for Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, Alaska Mission, Emerald Hodgson Hospital, Leper Fund, Blood Plasma Fund, Greek War Relief and Red Cross. They have given to our Bishop's Discretionary Fund, and have provided scholarships for both adults and young people to summer conferences and eight scholarships to send colored young people to summer confer-They have contributed to the Indian Work, to work among the blind and deaf, to our Agricultural School in Puerto Rico, the Church Mission of Help, Army and Navy Commission, Save the Children Federation, Bishop Rowe Memorial, the Good Shepherd Hospital in New Bern, the Thompson Orphanage, provided a discretionary fund for a student worker and college and paid part of her salary, contributed to the American Bible Society, the Unified Youth Program in the Diocese, Bishop Payne Divinity School, the work of the Holy Cross Missions and other gifts too numerous to mention. They have sent personal Christmas gifts to all the East Carolina women missionaries, both foreign and domestic.

More women have taken part in the World Day of Prayer, the Church-Wide Day of Prayer, May Fellowship Day and the Church Council of Women.

The report of the President of the Colored Convocation shows all the branches as being very active in the five fields of service. At the Provincial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary held in Nashville, Tenn., last October, the Chairman of the United Thank Offering Committee for the Province reported that the Colored branch of the Auxiliary in East Carolina was the only Diocesan Branch in the Province that had doubled its United Thank Offering last year.

Considerable progress was made during the year in Christian Education. Perhaps one of the greatest contributions made by this department has been the pamphlet "The Fellowship of the Prayer Book," compiled by Miss Hennie Long to be used as a supplement to the book gotten out by Forward in Service. Through the Educational Department the Auxiliary provided two of the courses taught at the Adult Conference at Camp Leach last summer.

During the past year the Department of Christian Social Relations has gone forward in service. Hundreds of garments were knitted, cut and made for the Red Cross. Auxiliary women served in welfare work and in many different organizations for war relief. Three thousand, two hundred and fifty-six garments have been given to needy persons in the several communities and in the Diocesan Missions. More than \$1,600 has been spent in the various communities for relief, including wood, food, clothing, medicines, house rent and baskets at Thanksgiving and Christmas. The Diocesan Auxiliary has been

the means of promoting, through this department and the Supply Department two important War Relief Agencies—the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration and Bundles for America. In September the call came to the women of the Church to provide warm clothing for free distribution to the countries liberated from the Nazis. Bundles for America provided for the production of garments for women and children in the Philippine Islands. Through the Department of Christian Social Relations and the Supply Department money and gifts totaling more than \$1,100 were sent to the Thompson Orphanage.

Figures are not always an indication of the most fundamental growth in any group, but I am sure you will agree with me that the fact that there has been a steady growth in the amount contributed by the women through the United Thank Offering is indicative of growth that is fundamental and vital. The United Thank Offering amounted to \$6,584.67 last year, an increase of more than \$1,200 over the previous year.

The work of the Church Periodical Club has gone forward this past year and we have contributed magazines, books and games to many institutions.

Through the work of the Promotion Department the Parish Auxiliary branches have a clearer understanding of the whole work of the Church and the Auxiliary's share and place in its program.

In 1944 as in past years, The Mission Herald has carried each month information and news about Auxiliary work. The Editor has been most generous in giving us space in our Diocesan paper and such publicity has been a very real help to us in carrying out our work.

Time forbids my mentioning much of the work being done by the Departments and Committees or the many worthwhile projects in which the women through their budget and special gifts have shared. In summing

up our gifts for the past year it is amazing to me to record the fact that the Auxiliary in this Diocese has raised in all the amount of \$23,107.35. The budget or apportionment which the women accepted was \$2,500.00. They have, therefore, given over and above this \$20,607.35 in actual cash.

I cannot close this report without thanking the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese for the help and consideration given the Auxiliary. We could not have accomplished so much without their cooperation. We have had good attendance at all meetings in spite of transportation difficulties because they have filled their cars and brought the women of their parishes to these meetings. For this and for their help in many ways we are deeply grateful.

#### APPENDIX "E"

# MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Executive Council of the Diocese of East Carolina met in St. Mary's Parish House, Kinston, at 10:30 A. M., Monday, October 9, 1944, and was opened with prayer by the Bishop.

Present: Rt. kev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D.; Rev. Walter R. Noe, Rev. Alexander Miller, Rev. John R. Tolar, Rev. E. F. Moseley, Rev. Jack R. Rountree, Rev C. E. Williams, Rev. William B. Daniels, Jr., Rev. John H. Bonner, Jr., Mr. J. A. Moore, Mrs. Baxter Moore and Mrs. W. O. S. Sutherland.

The Bishop read a letter from Mr. George B. Elliott in which he stated that, on account of his present physical condition, which will make it impossible for him to attend out of town meetings, he would like for the Executive Council to accept his resignation as Chairman of the Department of Missions and Church Extension. It was decided that Mr. Elliott could still be of real service to the Department and to ask him to continue as Chairman, with the understanding that some one be appointed to preside over the meetings if any meetings were held elsewhere than in Wilmington.

The Bishop stated that he would like for the St. Mary's campaign to be continued until all the people of the Diocese have an opportunity to make contributions. He stated that the Diocese of East Carolina had done very little for St. Mary's to this date.

The Rev. John R. Tolar, Chairman of the Finance Department, presented a letter that he had received from Mr. W. G. Gaither of Elizabeth City, in regard to send-

ing another letter to those who had made contributions towards paying off the Diocesan debt in the hope that the balance still due might be raised. After much discussion and full appreciation of Mr. Gaither's kind offer to do this follow-up work, it was decided that on account of other efforts being made at this time it might not be wise to ask for further contributions by individuals or groups for this purpose.

The Executive Council then took a recess to give time to the Departments for their meetings.

At 2:00 P. M. the Executive Council reassembled, the Bishop in the chair, and reports of the Departments were made as follows:

Missions and Church Extension by the Secretary in the absence of the Chairman.

Youth by the Rev. John H. Bonner, Jr.

Christian Education, by the Rev. E. F. Moseley.

Evangelism, by the Rev. Jack R. Rountree.

Finance, by the Rev. John R. Tolar.

Christian Social Relations, by the Rev. William B. Daniels, Jr.

Promotion, by the Rev. Alexander Miller.

The requests of the Youth Department for \$370.00 for its work in 1945 and the Camp Leach Committee for \$500.00 in 1945, were referred to the Finance Department with the request that these items be reported to the Executive Council at its first meeting in the new year.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

# RESOLUTION OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Bishop reported to the Executive Council, as representative of the Trustees of the Diocese of East Carolina, the following facts, to wit:

That the late Dr. Robert Brent Drane, by last Will and Testament, devised and bequeathed to the Trustees of the Diocese of East Carolina his cottage and lot at Nag's Head, N. C., subject to the life estate in his daughter, Mrs. Marian D. Graham; that the family of Dr. Drane had expressed a desire to purchase the interest of the Trustees in this property so as to keep it in the family; that upon considering the situation, the cost of maintaining the cottage, the probable fact that the rent would be inadequate to do more than maintain it, the Trustees had decided it would be wise to sell the interest of the Diocese in this property to Dr. Drane's family; that, accordingly, the property had been transferred to Mrs. Katherine Drane Perry, one of the daughters of Doctor Drane, in consideration of the sum of \$1,500.00 cash. The Bishop asked that the Council ratify and approve the action of the Trustees in the premises as a matter of Church Extension, and recommended that the Executive Council authorize the establishment of a fund with the proceeds received from the sale of the said property, the said fund to be known as "The Robert Brent Drane Memmorial Fund", the interest and income from this fund to be used for the support and maintenance of the Church of St. Andrews-by-the-Sea at Nag's Head, N. C.

Whereupon, after consideration, it was, on motion duly made and seconded,

Resolved: That the Executive Council hereby approves, ratifies and confirms the action of the Trustees of the Diocese in selling to Mrs. Katherine Drane Perry the interest of the Diocese in the property at Nag's Head, N. C., devised to the Diocese by the late Dr. Robert Brent Drane.

Resolved Further: That the Trustees of the Diocese are directed to turn over and deliver to the Treasurer the amount received from Mrs. Katherine Drane Perry as consideration of the purchase of this cottage, to wit,

\$1,500.00 less costs, if any, said money to be set up by the Treasurer in a special fund to be known as "The Robert Brent Drane Memorial Fund", the income therefrom to be used and applied toward the support and maintenance of the Church of St. Andrews-by-the-Sea, Nag's Head, N. C.
