IN MEMORIAM

At sixty-nine years of age, the Rev. Milton Augustus Barber, S.T.D., passed into Life eternal on March 10, 1938.

Born in Hyde County, he was the son of the Rev. Samuel Swann Barber and his wife, Adelaide Watson Barber.

His academic studies were at Trinity School, Chocowinity; his collegiate and theological at Hobart College, Geneva, N. Y., and the General Theological Seminary, New York City, respectively.

Made Deacon in 1898, he was advanced to the Priesthood in 1899. Deacon in charge and Rector of St. Paul's, Wilmington, N. C., from 1898-1900.

1900 to 1905, Rector of St. Mark's, San Marcos, Texas.

Called from St. Athanasius' Church, Burlington, N. C., in 1907, he became the sixth Rector of Christ Church, Raleigh, N. C. Here he served with glowing zeal and unwonted ability until physical disability brought about his retirement in 1935.

His Doctorate was conferred by Hobart College, his Alma Mater.

His interests were as wide as life.

Eminent in the Councils of the Church, for a number of years he was President of The Standing Committee, and, as Deputy from the Diocese of North Carolina, attended nine General Conventions. He was also a Deputy from West Texas.

Forcefully he combatted Evil, sturdily he stood unafraid for the Right. To his Master and his Church he was ever unflinchingly steadfast.

"Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of Life."

Journal of Proceedings

FIRST DAY

Tarboro, N. C., May 10, 1938

The one hundred and twenty second annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina was held in Calvary Church, Tarboro, beginning May 10, 1938.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. M. George Henry and the Bishop at 9:30 a. m.

At 10:15 a. m. the Bishop called the Convention to order. Instead of calling the roll, the secretary, by count, ascertained that a quorum was present, and so certified to the Bishop. The Bishop then declared the Convention duly organized. The Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence was elected secretary, and he appointed the Rev. Benjamin T. Brodie as his assistant.

The hours of Convention as on the printed program, with the omission of the address by Dr. Milton, were adopted.

The Bishop called the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes to the chair, and then read his annual address. (see Appendix A)

The Bishop then resumed the chair, and on motion, he was requested to appoint the two committees called for in his address.

The report of the Standing Committee was read by Mr. Joseph B. Cheshire, Jr.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE

The Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina had only three meetings during the year 1937.

On January 7, 1937 the Committee met at Hotel Wilrik, Sanford, N. C. At this meeting the Committee was organized as it was the first meeting after its election by the preceding Diocesan Convention and the following officers were elected: Reverend Milton A. Barber, S.T.D., President, Reverend Isaac Wayne Hughes, Vice-President, Mr. Joseph B. Cheshire, Secretary, and the following action was taken: Consent was given to the consecration of the Reverend William Leopold Essex as Bishop of the Diocese of Quincy, Ill. Consent was given to the choice by the House of Bishops of

the following Bishops of Missionary Districts: (1) Reverend Winfred Hamlin Zeigler, D.D., of the Missionary District of Wyoming. (2) Reverend Harry Beal, D.D. of the Missionary District of the Panama Canal Zone. (3) Reverend Douglass Henry Atwill, D.D. of the Missionary District of North Dakota.

Consent to the election of the Right Reverend Edward Huntington Coley, D.D., S.T.D., Suffragan Bishop, as Bishop of the Diocese of Central New York, was given.

The Bishop of the Diocese presented to the Committee the Schedule of Appropriations from the income of the Lawrence S. Holt Fund for the year 1937, and the same was approved, and the Bishop was authorized to make such adjustments and changes as might be found necessary in accordance with the actual receipts and to expend, in his discretion, any surplus above the estimated receipts.

The Committee met again at Saint Paul's Church, Winston-Salem, N. C., on May 12, 1937, and took the following action:

The Committee was again organized by the election of the same officers as above mentioned.

Consent was given to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Tennessee on account of extent of the Diocesan work.

Consent was given to the election of The Right Reverend Frank Whittington Creighton, S.T.D. as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Michigan.

Robert Macbeth Bird, candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate at any time after June 27, 1937.

The Committee met again at the office of the Secretary in the Raleigh Building and Loan Building, Raleigh, N. C., on June 17, 1937, and the following action was taken.

Consent was given for ordination and consecration of the Reverend Goodrich Robert Fenner as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Kansas.

The Reverend Ralph Andrew Bridges, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood at any time after June 21, 1937.

Mr. William Penn Price was recommended to the Bishop to be admitted as a candidate for Holy Orders.

The Committee held another meeting at Hotel Wilrik, Sanford, N. C., on January 11, 1938, which is now reported for information.

Consent was given for the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Raymond Adams Heron as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Massachusetts.

The Reverend Robert Macbeth Bird, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood at any time after his completion of one year's service as Deacon.

The Bishop of the Diocese presented to the Committee the Sche-

dule of Appropriations from the income of the Lawrence S. Holt Fund for the year 1938, and the same was approved, and the Bishop was authorized to make such adjustments and changes as might be found necessary in accordance with the actual receipts and to expend, in his discretion, any surplus above the estimated receipts.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Diocesan Executive Council wishes to report to the Diocesan Convention under two heads—matters of information and matters for action.

For Information

Three meetings were held on September 15, 1937, January 12, 1938, and April 28, 1938. At the first of these, the Bishop appointed the membership of the five departments of the Council as follows: FINANCE: Messrs. Kemp P. Lewis, Chairman, J. Porter Stedman, Kemp D. Battle, C. Shields Alexander, and Arthur P. Chippey. FIELD AND PUBLICITY: Rev. David T. Eaton, Chairman, Mr. Hobart T. Steele, and Mrs. William J. Gordon. RELIGIOUS EDUCATION: Rev. James M. Dick, Chairman, Rev. David W. Yates, Messrs. John S. Holmes, Ellerbe Powe, Jr., Arthur P. Chippey, and Mrs. Johnston King. SOCIAL SERVICE: Rev. John L. Jackson, Chairman, Mrs. Ross Sigmon. MISSIONS: Rev. William S. Turner, Chairman, Rev. B. N. deFoe Wagner, Mrs. William J. Gordon, and Mrs. Ross Sigmon.

The assessments of parishes and missions for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund were based on 8½% of current expenses. The quotas for the Church's Program Fund were found by obtaining an average of the following factors: (1) \$6.00 per communicant for parishes, \$3.00 per communicant for organized missions, and \$1.50 per communicant for unorganized missions, (2) the average amount given annually over the last three years, (3) 55% of current operating expenses for 1936.

The Diocesan Tour in the fall of 1937 in preparation for the annual Every Member Canvass was composed of Mr. Eaton, chairman of the Field Department, Bishop Nichols of the Mississippi District of Kyoto, and the Rev. Hector M. Thompson of Ethete, Wyoming. The two latter speakers were furnished by the National Field Department without expense to the Diocese.

With a view to personalizing missions, \$12,400 of this Diocese's 1937 contribution of \$16,000 to the National Church was designated for the following objects:

All undesignated Easter offerings were applied to China relief.

The Trustees of the Diocese were asked to make an inspection of the Bishop's residence and to ascertain what work was needed to put it in good condition and the cost of same.

Funds not being available for a full-time young people's worker as provided in the proposed 1938 budget which was under-subscribed, \$300 was appropriated to enable the members of the Diocesan Young People's Service League Executive Committee to visit the Leagues throughout the Diocese and stir up interest. Since January 1st they have traveled 2,401 miles, visited 29 Leagues, and talked to 509 people, on \$121.36. These figures are of April 28th.

The chairmen of the departments of the Executive Council were each assigned five minutes in which to report to the Diocesan Convention.

The failure of the Every Member Canvass to provide funds for the proposed 1938 budget of \$56,793 made necessary a revision of the budget to the total of \$42,793. A copy of the revised 1938 budget on which the Diocese is now operating is attached herewith.

For Action

The following matters are submitted to the Convention for action as resolutions that are hereby moved to be adopted:

Resolved: That the following arrearages on 1936 or 1937 assessments for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund be remitted:

Mr. Kemp P. Lewis then presented the budget for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund for 1939. After discussion, the budget was adopted.

Mr. Frank E. Winslow moved that the Executive Council be requested to report next year on a Diocesan Convention Entertainment Fund. Motion carried.

The budget for the Church's Program for 1939 was then presented. It was moved and carried that \$100 be added for student entertainment at State College, Raleigh, the money to be expended under the supervision of the Department of Religious Education.

On motion of the Rev. John L. Jackson, the title of the 14th item was changed to read "Promotional work of the Y. P. S. L."

Noonday prayers for missions were said by the Bishop.

On motion of the Rev. David W. Yates, item 8, the amount for Vade Mecum, was increased from \$600 to \$700.

As an explanation both of the budget and of the work of the Executive Council, reports were made by the Rev. David T. Eaton for the Department of Field and Publicity; the Rev. James M. Dick for the Department of Religious Education; the Rev. John L. Jackson for the

Department of Social Service; and the Rev. William S. Turner for the Department of Missions and Church Extension.

The budget for the Church's Program as amended was then adopted, and then the budget was adopted as a whole.

The Bishop then introduced the Rev. Dr. Henry D. Phillips to the Convention, and on motion, Dr. Phillips was given an honorary seat in the convention.

Mr. A. B. Andrews then read his report as Chancellor.

REPORT OF THE CHANCELLOR

To the Diocese of North Carolina:

As Chancellor, I beg to report that during the past year I have held several conferences with the Bishop of the Diocese, discussing matters of Civil Law, as well as Canon Law, none of which were decisions, but all were in an advisory capacity.

During the session of the General Convention at Cincinnati, I attended the conference held by the Association of Chancellors, about thirty (30) being present, in which there was a frank and

open discussion of Canon 41, relating to Marriage and Divorce, which showed wide diversity of opinion on the subject of this Canon, both by Bishops and Chancellors, some giving a liberal construction, and others a strict construction of the Canon of the General Convention.

The nearest that the conferences with the Bishop approached the matter of a written opinion, which it was not, was the incident of a person who complained against a clergyman who had been a witness in a suit brought by the party against his wife, involving the custody of their child. As being a witness in a case, in the Civil Courts, is the duty of a citizen, as well as the litigation having occurred fourteen years ago, and it being a case in which the party evidently held considerable feeling, concerning which complaint had also been made to Bishop Cheshire, in his life-time, the Bishop was advised that the complaint stated no ecclesiastical cause and he was advised to refer the party to his rights at the law, as he had been represented in his litigations by counsel resident in North Carolina.

THE REPORT OF THE HISTORIOGRAPHER

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

Since my election last May as historiographer of the Diocese, I have begun, at the suggestion of Bishop Penick, a biography of our late Bishop, Joseph Blount Cheshire. I intend that this work shall concern itself primarily with Bishop Cheshire's episcopate with a brief background of his work as deacon and priest in this diocese.

I began the biography last summer and have made reasonable progress with it since then. It will of necessity take some time to complete it since Bishop Cheshire left a great body of personal papers and writings and since I can devote only a portion of my time to it.

Work on this biography has been the full extent of my activities as historiographer and will continue to be my chief work until it is completed.

Nominations were made as in the rules of order.

The Bishop introduced to the Convention the new clergy; The Rev. Messrs. Robert M. Bird, Jesse S. Lockaby and Leicester F. Kent.

The Convention then took a recess for lunch.

At 2:30 p. m. the Convention reassembled. Nominations were continued.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Church was read by the Rev. Benjamin T. Brodie.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

Your committee on the State of the Church begs leave to submit the following report.

The statistics of the diocese, gathered from the parochial reports, are distinctly encouraging. In 1937 there were 383 infant baptisms, an increase of 18 over 1936. There were 92 adult baptisms. The number of confirmations, 648, is the largest figure reported in many years. The total number of baptized persons has gone up to 17,340, and the number of communicants to 12,594.

The most encouraging figures are in the Church School. Here there is a marked upward trend, after several years of discouragement. The largest increase is in Bible classes, 1,555 as compared to 1,416 of the year before.

However, we must remember that these increases over the previous year are small, and that for the past few years most of these figures have been decreasing. Furthermore, if we look at this in the light of our objective, it seems that our progress has been slight indeed.

If there is to be any real progress in this Diocese, your committee feels that some solution must be made to the problem arising from the fact that there are from two to three congregations to every minister in the Diocese. This situation makes it impossible for the clergy as a whole to do effective work. In many cases, it means merely the holding together of congregations that already exist, and in others, just having service once a month.

Your committee finds one promising field of the negro work without a minister, and we understand that a minister cannot be found for this work. Your committee hopes that what it has heard about the possibility of getting the Bishop Payne Divinity School to come to Raleigh is true. And we hope that it will be brought about in order that leaders may be trained in our own Diocese for this work.

Since the different institutions and organizations of the Diocese will make their own reports to this convention, we refrain from a detailed comment upon them here. However, we would like to say that we are pleased to note that the Vade Mecum Camp and Conference Center has added several new programs this year, and that the leaders of the Young People's Service League are seeking

to help and inspire its members to a more consecrated effort by visiting the individual leagues. These, and many other such things, testify to the fact that our institutions and organizations are strong, active, and useful.

We believe that the church is progressing, that signs of that progress are in evidence, but that many opportunities are not being grasped, and that the situation calls for renewed and more vigorous effort on the part of both the clergy and the laity.

The Chair recognized Mr. E. O. Schaefer of Asheboro, who spoke on the work of the Good Shepherd Mission, and requested that arrears of \$20 be cancelled. On motion, these arrears were remitted.

The report of the Trustess of the Diocese was read by Mr. Joseph B. Cheshire, Jr.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESE

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

The Trustees of the Diocese respectfully report to the Convention:

1. The actions taken by the Trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina with reference to the funds and properties of the Diocese are set forth in Schedule A hereto attached.

2. The account of the Trustees of the Diocese is shown on Schedule B hereto attached, the summary of the matters contained in said Schedule is made in the report of the Treasurers, pages 13, 14, 15 and 16.

3. The following matters contained in the above mentioned report the Trustees believe should be called to the attention of the Convention:

- (a) Due to the lower value of stocks and bonds, the total market value of the trust, as of January 15th, 1938, has declined

from the total cost value of the securities held in the sum of \$1624.01. However, the rate of income computed on the cost value of said trust amounted to 4.96%, after deducting commissions and expenses incurred by the Custodian, for the year; on January 15th, 1937, the rate computed on the same value was 4.98%.

- (b) The Alexander B. Andrews Trust, through the continued generosity of Alexander B. Andrews, Esquire, of Raleigh, North Carolina, was increased by the sum of \$5,000.00, payable \$500.00 per year over a period of 10 years. This splendid gift by Mr. Andrews is not reflected in the report of the Custodian, since Mr. Andrews' gift was made on February 15th, 1938, and will be included in the next report of the Custodian.
- (c) The Trustees are proceeding with the plan of eventually insuring all Diocesan property under schedule policies. Work is now being done on the plan but it has not progressed to such a point that any definite report upon the success of the same can now be made.
- (d) As shown in the report of the Custodian, the archdeacon's residence, 627 West Jones Street, Raleigh, N. C., was repaired at a total principal cost of \$5,200.00. Of this sum, the amount of \$450.00 has been repaid during the year. The Trustees anticipate a further reduction in that expenditure during the current year.

4. The Diocese of North Carolina owns a considerable amount of non-income producing property which is no longer used for church purposes and which, it appears, the church will not be able to use in its work for a considerable time to come. Examples of such property are: a church lot and building in Gulf, North Carolina; a lot in the town of Wake Forest, North Carolina; St. Joseph's, Spencer, and a lot in Mocksville. The Trustees are not in a position to determine whether it is advantageous to the Diocese to retain these properties, having in mind the development of mission work and the spiritual welfare of the Diocese. From a financial consideration, it appears that it would be advantageous to dispose of unused and non-productive property so that the income from the proceeds of the sale of such property could be used for the missionary work of the Diocese. Of course any special trusts attached to such property would necessarily have to be adhered to.

It occurs to the Trustees that the Bishop of the Diocese is familiar with the projected missionary work of the Diocese and would be in a position to determine whether the property should be retained for future use and that, with the approval of the Bishop, the Trustees might be authorized to convert investments in non-

productive property into such form as would produce an income for the mission work of the Church.

The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes then took the chair, and the Rev. William H. Wheeler addressed the Convention on the work of the Orphanage.

The Bishop then read the report of the Trustees of St. Mary's School and Junior College.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL AND JUNIOR COLLEGE

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Incorporation the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith the report of this Board for the academic year 1937-38.

Since the Diocesan Convention of 1937 the following important meeting of the governing boards of Saint Mary's have been held: June 3, 1937, Semi-Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees; June 17, 1937, Executive Committee; July 10th, 1937, Finance Committee; February 16, 1938, Executive Committee. In accordance with resolutions passed the following actions directed have been completed.

1. Refinancing the original \$80,000—6% loan from the Mutual Life Insurance Company with the National Life Insurance Company of Burlington, Vermont, \$55,000.00 at 4½% interest.
2. The 10th grade high school work is to be retained for the 1938-39 session pending further action.
3. The William Preston Bynum legacy matter has been closed by a deed of release to Mrs. Bynum.
4. The Alumnae Association has been released from all obligations on account of the Organ Fund Note which has been cancelled.
5. Mr. A. W. Tucker made Secretary-Treasurer of the Board of Trustees in place of Mr. A. L. Purrington, Junior, resigned.
6. Acceptance of an annual donation of \$1500.00 for three years from the Carnegie Foundation for new books for the Library—total \$4500.00.

7. Acceptance of gift of a beautiful mirror from the Aiken family of Brunswick, Georgia, which has been placed in the Main Entrance of Smedes Hall.
8. Auditorium repairs completed at an outlay of \$3,000.00 and the building made safe for capacity use. Included were new floor supports, maple floor, interior decoration and outside painting.
9. Extensive electrical wiring repair completed to reduce fire hazard.
10. Erection completed of New Music Building at approximate cost, with new furnishings, \$7500.00. Ready for students upon the opening of school in mid-September, 1937.
11. Invitation extended the Diocesan Department of Religious Education to hold its conference at Saint Mary's on June 6, 7, and 8, 1938.

The 1937-38 session now nearing its close has been most satisfactory with a capacity registration of 209 resident students and 71 Day and Special Students. The policy of a flat general charge including the tuition in all Fine Arts and Special Department courses has received the hearty approval of Saint Mary's patrons. Registration in the Music, Expression, Art and Home Economic Departments has greatly increased.

An analysis of the resident students' registration of 209 students shows 25 states represented as follows: North Carolina 100; Virginia 29; South Carolina 18; Georgia 10; New Jersey 7; District of Columbia and Pennsylvania 5 each; Maryland and New York 4 each; Alabama, Florida and Tennessee 3 each; Kentucky, Massachusetts and Texas 2 each; Colorado, Connecticut, Illinois, Louisiana, Minnesota, Mississippi, Ohio, Rhode Island, West Virginia, and Wyoming 1 each. One student is registered from Quebec, Canada and 1 from Paris, France.

This group gives their religious affiliation as follows: Episcopalian 131; Presbyterian 31; Methodist 24; Baptist 16; Lutheran 3; Catholic 2; Reform 1; Christian Science 1.

As this report is written we have accepted 139 applications of returning and new students for the 1938-39 session which opens in mid-September, which is another record figure as of this date and indicates a capacity registration of 200 students for the fall term. It is most gratifying that the above registration includes the re-applications of 18 more returning students than the number we reopened with for the present session.

Mrs. Alexander Cooper of Henderson, N. C. now President of Alumnae Association, succeeded Miss Easdale Shaw of Rockingham, N. C.

Miss Kate Spruill of Rocky Mount, N. C., accepted the position of Alumnae Secretary in September, 1937, succeeding Miss Alice Alexander of Charlotte, N. C., resigned.

A condensed financial statement of the Business Manager, Mr.

A. W. Tucker, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1937, is hereto attached and made a part of this report.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

Bishop Penick, and Members of the Convention:

As I come before you, representing the more than 2800 women of the Auxiliary, I am overwhelmed at the thought of what this report might include. "The King's business requireth haste" and consecrated energy; the souls of men all around us are faint and dying, our task is a common one. Should we not anticipate reports that show the mighty working of the Holy Spirit? I trust that another year, under your leadership we may turn to God with a new vision and be used of Him for more spiritually fruitful things.

However, we do feel thankful as we look back over the year's activities. The growth of the Auxiliary is marked not so much by an increase in branches, or in membership, as in a strengthened internal organization, especially in some of the larger parishes—

and in a small but steady increase in the number of young women who are working in the Auxiliary and accepting places of leadership. Also there has been a very encouraging evidence of development in the Negro District. The financial gifts have been generous, the total amount expended being more than \$25,000. This included \$1,000 distributed to various specials, both within the diocese, especially at Asheboro and Albemarle, and beyond our own boundaries; and \$500 sent for Chinese Relief, one of the first gifts to be made after the Relief Fund was voted at the General Convention. In addition to the budget accepted for 1938, a special self-denial gift of \$750 was undertaken during Lent, to build a root cellar for Miss Blacknall's work at Nenana and to buy the necessary pump and plumbing fixtures that will enable Archdeacon Simmonds to "harness" a spring at Cape Mount, Liberia, and put water in the House of Bethany, St. John's School and a new hospital being built by Auxiliary funds. The Auxiliary in this diocese gave 1-18 of the total increase in the United Thank Offering presented at Cincinnati and ranked 17th among the diocesan branches in its total U. T. O. gift. The North Carolina Auxiliary had a full delegation for the two weeks of the Triennial Meeting and a definite part on the program. Many other women attended for a part of the time as visitors.

The Missionary Study included "Rural America" with three Educational Institutes led by Rev. C. E. B. Robinson, diocesan chairman of rural work; and "The Moslem World," many leaders for this subject taking classes under Dr. Sherman at either Kanuga or Vade Mecum. In addition there were addresses at the Annual Meeting by Rev. and Mrs. L. G. McAfee who work among the followers of Mohammed in the Philippine Islands, and by Miss Mary Wood McKenzie whose work in Liberia touches the Moslem World. There was some practical expression of interest in each of these fields, and I believe the women are ready to help the diocese develop its rural work.

Many Auxiliary women, including the Secretary of Christian Social Service, attended the recent Conference in Greensboro led by Rev. Almon H. Pepper. There has been a renewed and increased interest in the work of the Thompson Orphanage.

In the mission field, Miss Mary Baker Jenkins resigned her work at the Cathedral School for Girls, Havana, and her place was taken by Miss Norene Quern, a member of St. Peter's, Charlotte. The Auxiliary provided a scholarship at the Tuttle Training School for a young woman from Cuba, who is preparing herself to serve among her own people.

A major project of last year was the five day conference held at Vade Mecum the last week in July, after a lapse of two years. Leaders and members were greatly inspired and encouraged by the results and we commend to your support and interest the Conference planned for this season.

There has been among us a deep desire that our chief emphasis should be upon things spiritual, as we have realized our own need and longing for "a closer walk with God" and the heart-hunger of the world around us. The majority of the branches observed the Day for Prayer, Nov. 11, and shared in the Interdenominational observance of the World Day of Prayer, March 4. A few more Bible Classes have been reported. During the first week in Lent, a Quiet Day was held in each of the eight Districts. Not only is the need tragically obvious, but many of us are aware of the day of opportunity, as here and there, men, women, and young people are seeking the reality that can be found only in our Lord Jesus Christ. The challenge is to real things that shall result in the rule of Christ in the hearts and lives of individuals first, and then in the social conditions around us. A report that is satisfied with anything less, is of little value. God has a way out; the power of His Holy Spirit is unlimited; the call to discipleship is a personal one. Dare we be content with our little round of lesser things and fail our brethren in their hour of spiritual need—and fail our Christ?

The report of St. Augustine's College was read by the Rev. Edgar H. Goold.

REPORT OF ST. AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE INCLUDING ST. AGNES HOSPITAL
AND THE BISHOP TUTTLE SCHOOL

During the past year, there has been a total enrollment of 301 students including pupils in the St. Agnes Training School for Nurses and in the Bishop Tuttle Training School for Religious Education and Christian Social Service. It is interesting to note that 225 students were enrolled in the regular College Department, the same number that were enrolled this year in the College of Liberal Arts of the University of the South at Sewanee.

As usual about one half of the students come from North Carolina, the other half from 25 states and several foreign countries. Texas, Arkansas, California, Michigan, Mississippi and the Virgin Islands are among the distant points represented. About fifty per cent of our students are Communicants of our Church, coming from our Negro parishes in various parts of the country. Each year there are some added by confirmation. St. Augustine's has as a definite objective a close relationship with and strengthening of the work that is being done among our Negro people throughout the Church.

On January 13th the college celebrated the 70th Anniversary of its opening. It was on that date in 1868 that the Institution opened its doors to a class of four pupils. A Charter had been secured

the previous year by Bishop Atkinson of North Carolina with a group of prominent Churchmen of the State as incorporators. The anniversary was fittingly observed by a service of Thanksgiving at which Bishop Penick spoke. Later on there was a mass meeting with the principal address by Dr. E. George Paine, Assistant Dean of the School of Education of New York University and a warm friend of the college. We were pleased to note that heads of the other five colleges in Raleigh were present at this meeting, four of them in person and the other through a special representative.

In connection with the Anniversary there has been published a History of St. Augustine's compiled and written by a member of the Faculty, Professor Cecil D. Halliburton. Professor Halliburton also reviewed the History of the Institution in his address at the Anniversary Day Banquet. The History is the result of careful and thorough research studies and presents an excellent picture of the growth of St. Augustine's and its present status. We commend it to those who are interested in the affairs of the College and in the History of the Diocese. As Bishop Penick wrote to the author—"This is one of the few instances of historical scholarship that has been produced in this diocese within recent years. You have placed the entire Church as well as St. Augustine's College in your debt."

During the past year there have met at St. Augustine's the State Public Welfare Institution for Negro Workers, the Crown and Sceptre State Scholarship Society and various gatherings of a more informal nature. The annual St. Augustine's Conference for Negro Clergy and Church workers including a Young People's Conference, which is held early in June has become increasingly effective and well known so that several Dioceses are offering scholarships to it.

At a meeting of the Southern Bishops held in Atlanta in February it was unanimously recommended that the Bishop Payne Divinity School of Petersburg, Virginia, be moved to Raleigh and located in the vicinity of St. Augustine's College. At present the Trustees of the Bishop Payne School have the matter under consideration but have not as yet reached a final decision.

The financial stability of the Institution continues to be a matter of grave concern as the income is inadequate for the needs of the college. The decrease of about fifty percent in the annual appropriation from Church sources is largely responsible for this situation.

There is still a pressing need for a substantial endowment and for increased help from both the National Church and from the Dioceses in the State of North Carolina whose share in the responsibility for the maintenance and development of St. Augustine's has not yet been adequately realized. In this respect we are hoping for the coming of a better day.

St. Agnes Hospital

St. Agnes Hospital with its Training School for Nurses continues its excellent work. During the past year there have been 25,272 hospital days, 1,258 bed patients, 1,531 clinic patients, 2,904 out patient visits and 1,003 operations. For some time now the Hospital has been working with the State Commission for the Blind holding clinics and admitting patients for observation or operation. A large work is also being done for Crippled Children in connection with the State Division for Crippled Children. Considerably over one-half of the work of the hospital is on charitable basis. The annual aid received from the Duke Endowment based on charitable work done is one of the chief sources of financial support. A special gift of over \$200 from the offering taken at the Mission held at Christ Church, Raleigh, in March was very helpful. The work continues to be accredited by the American College of Surgeons, the American Medical Society and the State Association of Schools of Nurse Training.

Graduates from the Training School continue to be called to important administrative positions. The Superintendent of the Richardson Memorial Hospital in Greensboro, N. C., the superintendent of the New Good Shepherd Hospital in New Bern, N. C., and the Superintendent of Nurses at the Lincoln Hospital in Durham, N. C., are all graduates of the St. Agnes School which was a pioneer in the field of training Colored Nurses.

Bishop Tuttle School

This school for training Church Workers in Religious Education and Social Service receives its chief support from the United Thank Offering of the National Women's Auxiliary and in its administration St. Augustine's is assisted by an Advisory Committee appointed by the National Council. The graduates are widely scattered throughout the country and are engaged in various types of Church or Community work. In an effort to assist in building up our Negro Church Work in a definite way it has been decided to place greater emphasis in the curriculum on the training for leadership in the field of Religious Education. It is hoped that from the Church will come suitable candidates for this type of training and in the Church positions and opportunities will be provided for them on their graduation. A widening interest in the development of our Negro Church Work would stimulate this ideal.

In conclusion I would extend now as in the past a cordial invitation to our Church people to visit St. Augustine's and to acquaint themselves with the work that is being done there as a part of the Church's program so closely connected with the Diocese and the American Church Institute for Negroes.

REPORT OF COLLEGE WORK

In most gatherings of the Episcopal Church, it is a common habit for speakers to point out the many failures of the Church in all the fields in which it is working. We have recently heard much about the failure of the Church in rural sections; it might help us also to point out the many successes in rural fields. So when we come to college work, though manifestly there is an immense field to cover, and an appalling mass of work to be done, yet as we see what is going on, we may well thank God and take courage.

The college population in this diocese continues to increase, and as the College commission pointed out at General Convention, "Episcopalians are denser in the colleges." So nowhere is there greater opportunity for missionary work than in the colleges. And the work is not just diocesan; it is national and international. At Chapel Hill, among the Episcopalians, there are 182 from outside North Carolina, and these represent 27 states and 2 foreign countries. At Duke even more states are represented among our Church students. The work done at a North Carolina college today may, even as soon as next year, have its effect in the far west, in China, in Latin America, or in Europe.

The object of those of us who work in college communities is to make traditional religion into vital religion, and to confront the young man or woman with the claims of Christ. Whatever social work is done has this end in view. Nowhere are we trying to bring the student to church by means of suppers, dances, etc.

In the confines of such a report as this, it is not possible to tell much of what is being done. The reports of St. Mary's and St. Augustine's are made separately. Mention should be made of the forum at the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, attended by students from State, Meredith, Peace and secretarial schools, and also of its Sunday morning Bible Classes. At Duke all new men were visited on the campus, and a monthly Celebration of the Holy Communion has been held in the College Chapel. The student forum has been only partly successful. At the Woman's College at Greensboro programs of student activity have been developed, with numerous committees. The effect of more jobs for the girls has increased interest considerably. At Chapel Hill the activity and interest of the student vestry has been most helpful. Besides conducting the Sunday night services, the vestry provided readers for reading the lessons at the daily services through Lent. So, with acolytes and choir and ushers, we have had fully 50 students actively engaged in some form of Church work.

Last November a college student conference was held in Greensboro at St. Mary's House. About 70 students from 18 colleges were present. The conference was conducted by the Rev. Dr. T.

O. Wedel, and was, we hope, the first of many. Its great value was to develop a corporate sense among the college students.

Every report needs a recommendation. Mine has been made for me by the Student Vestry at Chapel Hill. As a result of their interest in the work of the Church, they became convinced of the need of an assistant to the rector of the Chapel of the Cross, and so drew up and presented a letter to the three Conventions. This letter has been published in the *N. C. Churchman*, and has been presented to the Executive Council of the Diocese. The Executive Council has put \$500 in the budget for this purpose for 1939, and this convention has already ratified this budget.

There still remains the rest of this year. If it is in any way possible, a man should be secured to begin the college year in September. I cannot look for a man until I have some assurance as to salary. All that is needed from this diocese for the rest of the year is \$166.67, and I hope this Convention may make provision for this sum. The rest of the salary of this assistant will be raised by the two other dioceses and by the vestry of the Chapel of the Cross.

To place two men at Chapel Hill is a real step forward in our college work, and I trust it will soon be possible to give both Duke and State College the care they undoubtedly need.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN CAMPS AND CONFERENCES FOR 1937

The Management—

Under the auspices of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, a Camp Committee appointed by the Bishop, is the governing body. This Committee appoints the **Business Manager**, who selects a permanent staff for the season. The Camp Committee is divided into four sub-committees, the Bishop being an *ex-officio* member of each Committee.

The permanent staff selected by the Business Manager is as follows:

Camp Nurse.

Dietician.

Secretary.

Three boys to serve as truck drivers, night watchmen, and general handy men.

Three cooks.

In addition to these, it is necessary to supplement the permanent staff during the adult Conferences with several waitresses, and during the Junior Camps with a Camp Mother. These persons are under the supervision of the Business Manager, and they are

responsible for operation of the framework of the Camp in accordance with the needs and interests, as far as possible, of each Camp and Conference.

The Staff Faculty and Counselors—

The Directors of each Camp and Conference are in charge of their particular program. They are directly responsible for the activities of their Camps and Conferences, and their Counselors and Faculty.

Attendance for 1937—

The total attendance for the summer was 526 persons, the largest attendance being at the Junior Camps. The capacity for the season is approximately 700 persons.

Repairs and Improvements Made in 1937—

The Winston-Salem Foundation granted \$6,000 from the interest accumulated on the endowment for repairs and improvements to the property. A volumetric type chlorinator was purchased at a cost of \$700.00, and installed at the reservoir, and a chlorinator house was constructed. Repairs were made to the pipe line from the reservoir to the hotel. The electric wiring system in the main building was repaired. Some minor repairs were made to the caretaker's house. An estimate including the cost of construction, the complete plan and blue prints for utilizing the water power at Vade Mecum for electric power, was made. The swimming pool was painted. The total expenditure for this work was \$3,146.75.

The Vade Mecum Camps purchased a Ford station wagon and incidental equipment at an expenditure of \$893.05.

Program for 1938—

The schedule for 1938 includes two new Conferences and one new Camp. The College Girls Conference is the outgrowth of the College Girls Camp, which for the last few years, has proven itself to be unsuccessful. The School of Teacher Training is a new venture, designed to give instruction and practical training to the Clergy, Superintendents, and Teachers of the Church Schools in the small Parishes and Missions of the Diocese. Camp Tise is a one-week Scholarship Camp for Boys, who would otherwise not have the opportunity to attend any Camp. We are expecting a capacity registration for the 1938 season.

Improvements for 1938—

With the balance left from the \$6,000 granted by the Winston-Salem Foundation, the following improvements and repairs have been made for 1938:

The bathroom facilities on the second floor of the main building have been enlarged with the construction of an additional bathroom. A three car garage with living quarters for the cooks has been constructed. The swimming pool has been re-painted. The

floor in the gymnasium has been varnished. Plumbing repairs and improvements include the extension of the pipe line from the mineral spring and the disposal line from the kitchen. The roof of the main building has been repaired. Several repairs and improvements have been made to the caretaker's cottage. A contract for the complete re-wiring of the main building for 110 volts is about to be let. The kitchen stove has been re-built.

Plans for Enlargement of Vade Mecum—

The Vade Mecum Committee, at a meeting last fall realized that the Camp and Conference center is no longer merely a place where the children of the Diocese go for a few weeks Camp period. The committee feels that Vade Mecum is making a real contribution to the lives of people throughout the Diocese, but that the scope of its work has been limited. Therefore, definite plans for the future will make Vade Mecum the Conference center of the Diocese available for Conventions, week-end retreats, special Conferences, as well as, the three month summer program. A campaign is already under way to raise funds for a Building Expansion Program. This project cannot be undertaken by the Winston-Salem Foundation for several reasons. The plan is to build ten cabins, housing eight

campers and a counselor each, and two bath houses at a total cost of \$4,500.00. This must be paid for by the Diocese of North Carolina. The Winston-Salem Foundation, it is hoped, will extend the water and sewer disposal system.

The construction of these cabins will leave the main building available for class rooms, office space, library, dining hall, kitchen, handicraft work shop, infirmary, housing accommodations for the permanent staff, and space for hotel accommodations or over night guests.

There are several other buildings on the Vade Mecum property, which in course of time, will be renovated or torn down. The Sparks cottage will be made available for Conferences the year around. A new barn is needed for the farm. The dance pavilion and old store buildings must be destroyed.

There is a possibility that a golf course, several new tennis courts, a lake, and a usable athletic field can be added at Vade Mecum.

The following resolutions are offered:

1. WHEREAS the management of the Vade Mecum Camps is not legally connected with the Diocese of North Carolina, neither is the name Diocesan Camps and Conferences legally adopted, it has been necessary to procure automobile license, equipment, and supplies, in many instances, in the name of the Business Manager.

And WHEREAS, the Business Manager, legally, is personally responsible for the health and safety of all who are employed by the staff and all who attend the Camps and Conferences,
Be it therefore resolved that the Diocesan Camps and Conferences, and the Farm connected with it be incorporated under the name "Vade Mecum Camps" of the Diocese of North Carolina.

2. WHEREAS the position of Business Manager of Vade Mecum Camps and Conferences is in itself practically a full time job, and one that should not be combined with a Parochial or Mission charge,

Be it resolved that the position of Business Manager be made a part time job for a man who might serve as Y. P. worker, or that it be a full time job, with salary paid by the Diocese of North Carolina.

3. *Resolved:* That the Diocesan Camps and Conferences have official representation on the Executive Council of the Diocese of North Carolina, through the present Committee as a definite creature of the Convention, through The Department of Religious Education.

The three resolutions attached were offered. Resolution 1, on motion of the Rev. David T. Eaton, was re-

ferred to a special committee, composed of the committee on the report of the Trustees of the Diocese together with the Chancellor. Resolution 2, on motion of the Rev. John A. Wright, was referred to the Executive Council. Resolution 3 was lost.

The Bishop nominated the Vade Mecum committee as follows:

The Rev. Messrs. D. W. Yates, M. G. Henry, A. S. Lawrence, Jr., J. A. Vaché, J. Q. Beckwith, D. W. Allen, A. S. Lawrence, R. M. Bird, and Messrs. J. A. Mackie, J. P. Stedman, W. A. Goodson, Hobart Steele, Mrs. W. J. Gordon, Mrs. J. L. Gilmer.

The nominations were confirmed by the Convention.

The Bishop announced the committees as printed on page 7.

The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes paid tribute to the late Dr. Milton A. Barber, and offered a resolution that a committee be appointed to draw up a suitable memorial minute to be inserted in the Journal. The Chair appointed as such committee the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes, the Rev. R. Bruce Owens, Mr. Frank P. Haywood and Col. Gordon Smith.

The report of the Board of Examining Chaplains was read by the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence.

The report of the Lenten Offering was presented by the Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, Jr.

LENTEN OFFERING—1938

Ninety-six Church Schools reported a Lenten Offering for 1938. Of these 58 have increased their offering over last year; 4 remained the same; 27 show a decrease, and 7 new schools reported. Only 7 Church Schools in the Diocese made no report.

The Offering was \$6,119.33, an increase of \$819.00.

The loose offering taken at the eight Presentation Services was \$50.78 which has been sent to our work in Liberia.

The largest offering was from Holy Trinity, Greensboro, \$497.69. May we also add that this Church which has consistently led the other Churches in the Diocese in the amount of their Lenten Offering, this year leads all other Churches in the amount of increase over last year's. St. Paul's, Winston-Salem, had the second highest offering with \$406.62; St. Peter's, Charlotte, was third with \$345.52, and St. Martin's, Charlotte was fourth with, \$336.82. The highest offering from a Negro Church was made by St. Augustine's, Raleigh, with \$332.80. The highest offering from a Mission Church was from St. Luke's, Spray, \$207.73.

We should like to call attention to several parishes which reported large increases in their offering this year over the year 1937.

Holy Trinity, Greensboro; Holy Innocents, Henderson; St. Paul's, Winston-Salem; Scotland Neck, Trinity; St. Paul's, Monroe, St. Stephen's, Erwin.

We would like to call especial attention to St. Joseph's, Durham, which reported the largest increase for a Mission.

Mr. S. E. Burroughs reported for the Layman's League.

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

Since the organization of the Laymen's League in the diocese, 29 branches have been chartered, with a membership of approximately 500.

During the past year emphasis has been given to a revival of interest in branches already chartered rather than organizing new ones. Experience has proven that in every parish where a branch of the League has been firmly established, increased interest has been shown in every department of Church work.

In July, the League held a two days' Conference Retreat for men at Vade Mecum. The attendance was very good, and a splendid program arranged. A similar Retreat will be held this year, and it is expected that at least 500 men will attend.

The Annual Laymen's League Convention was held in the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, December 19, with 74 delegates present, representing 17 branches.

We commend the League to you as an organization to harness the manpower of the Church to do the Church's work.

We beg your prayers, and your cooperation.

The Rev. James M. Dick presented the report of the special committee on the Kanuga Conference, appointed last year.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON KANUGA

To the Bishop and Members of the Diocesan Convention:

Bishop Penick's address to the Diocesan Convention of 1937 contained a section entitled "Kanuga," in which he set forth the opinion that this Diocese is now a conspicuous beneficiary of the Kanuga Lake Conference Center, and while we share its benefits, we carry none of its burdens and are not "officially" connected with its management.

He then set forth his opinion that the time had arrived when this Diocese should re-examine our relationship to Kanuga with a view to applying for official status.

The Bishop requested that a special Committee be appointed "to investigate the possibility of formal participation by this Diocese in the Kanuga Lake Corporation and to report the results of their findings to the Convention of 1938."

The Committee appointed was composed of the following:

On February 8, the Chairman, Mr. Holmes, and Rev. Mr. Hughes attended a meeting of the Board of Managers of Kanuga in Trinity Parish House, Columbia, S. C., to gather information in regard to formal participation of this Diocese in the Lake Kanuga Cor-

poration. The Committee was received most graciously and was extended a voice and seat and every courtesy.

The Financial statement and the Constitution of the Kanuga Conference Association were both read and freely discussed.

The Committee retiring from the meeting, the members of the Board of Managers freely discussed the intentions of the Committee from the Diocese of North Carolina, and the following resolution was adopted:

“Resolved: that in accordance with the provisions of our Constitution, and to avoid unnecessary delay, the Diocese of North Carolina be elected as a participating Diocese of Kanuga Conferences.”

The above refers to article eleven of the Constitution which says: “A Diocese shall be considered as participating when it has been elected by the Board of Managers and when its representatives have been either elected or appointed on the Board of Trustees and the Board of Managers as set forth in the foregoing provisions, and is cooperating in the activities of one or more of the Conferences.”

After attending this meeting, and after making a thorough study of the Constitution and Financial Report of the Kanuga Lake Corporation, we, the members of the special Kanuga Committee do hereby recommend “that this Diocesan Convention accept the terms of its election as a participating Diocese of the Kanuga Conference.”

COMMENTS

If we accept our election as a participating Diocese, the Constitution provides that this Diocese will officially be represented on the Board of Managers by the Bishop, one clergyman and one layman, elected by the Diocesan Executive Council, a representative of the Women’s Auxiliary elected by that body, and a representative elected from their membership by the Young People’s Service League of the Diocese, a total of five.

In case of failure to elect, the Bishop shall have power to appoint in all cases.

In addition to this, all participating Dioceses are entitled to one lay representative on the Board of Trustees, said layman to be elected by the Diocesan Convention, or appointed by the Bishop for a term of three years.

The original cost of the physical property at Kanuga was about \$90,000.00, which was raised through campaigns.

The Treasurer's report, as of February, 1938, shows a total indebtedness of \$20,649.00. This amount represents money borrowed to develop and improve the property. Which means that besides the cost value of the property, there may be added about \$20,000.00 as permanent repairs and additional lands, etc.

The Camps and Conferences are largely attended and operate on a paying basis, plus a sum each year to go toward liquidating the debt, \$6,047.93 being paid on notes and interest in 1937, as shown by the Treasurer's report.

Your committee would make one further observation—in anticipation of the fear of any one here as to the obligation we assume if we accept the Committee's recommendation:

Article 5: "The Board of Managers shall annually inform the Trustees of the financial affairs of the Association, especially all liabilities.

"If at any time the legal and moral obligations upon the property shall equal one-third of its total value, as set by an impartial board of appraisors, it shall become the duty of the Board of Managers to call the Board of Trustees into conference and, if it shall seem advisable, to make sale of the property as soon as an advantageous offer can be secured; and after paying all obligations to divide the remainder among the participating Dioceses upon such basis of division as may be agreed upon by said Dioceses."

After explanation, the report with the attached resolution, was adopted unanimously.

Mr. John S. Holmes was then nominated as Lay Trustee of Kanuga. On motion the rules were suspended, and the secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the convention for Mr. Holmes.

The Rev. Willis G. Clark offered the following resolution:

HOSPITALITY

Whereas the hospitality shown to the delegates of this Convention, by the Rector and members of Calvary Church and their friends of other Churches in Tarboro, has even exceeded its enviable reputation,

And whereas it is a great privilege to all of us, of this Convention, to be their guests, and whereas our stay among them is an experience which will linger long among our most cherished memories, Therefore be it resolved, *that*, by standing vote, we express our appreciation to the Rector, Vestry and members of Calvary Parish and their many friends of Tarboro, for all that they have done in entertaining us so charmingly and graciously,

and facilitating the work of this Convention so happily and efficiently; and that we express our appreciation of the work done in getting out the historical sketch of Calvary Parish which is so complete with information and inspiration.

Mr. John S. Holmes offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved: that the Committee on Canons be requested to prepare and present to the next Convention an amendment to Canon XXII, dealing with vestries, so that women may be eligible to election on vestries.

The Rev. Roma C. Fortune presented his report.

REPORT OF THE MISSION TO THE DEAF

The undersigned Missiionary to the Deaf in the Diocese of North Carolina desires to make the following brief report of his work from May 1, 1937, to May 1, 1938:

Within this time he has delivered 162 sermons and addresses. He has baptized one infant and one adult. He has officiated at two marriages and two funerals.

He presented one candidate for Confirmation in Ephphatha Church, Durham.

Omitting the number of persons attending the regular services in Ephphatha Church, Durham, and St. Athanasius Church Burlington, he has ministered through service and sermon to 1,340 persons at the various mission points in the Diocese.

More and more our deaf people who live in remote sections are able, by means of the automobile, to come long distances to attend our services at central points.

I visited the North Carolina School for the Deaf in Morganton and delivered chapel talks to the students. There is a growing interest in our mission. All the stations which I visit show marked improvement, and we face the future with confidence. Our people are being aroused to the fact that the Episcopal Church is the real friend of the Deaf. We are very grateful to the Church for its unflinching support and for the cordial reception we have from our Bishop, the Clergy, and all the laymen and laywomen.

It was moved and carried that the action of the Convention in ratifying the Vade Mecum Committee be reconsidered. It was then moved that the Vade Mecum Committee be continued until the next meeting of the Council, at which time it should be discontinued. Carried.

For the special committee on the report of the Trustees, Mr. S. P. Collier reported as follows:

Your committee to whom was referred the report of the Trustees of the Diocese recommend approval thereof. We concur in the Trustees' recommendation that they proceed to dispose of non-productive property, subject to the complete approval of the Bishop.

This report was adopted, and then the Report of the Trustees was also adopted.

The Rev. R. Bruce Owens reported for the Committee on Canons.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS

Your Committee on Canons respectfully reports:

1. That we have received from the Secretary of the House of Deputies of General Convention notification of proposed amendments to Art. XI of the Constitution, which amendments are to be voted on at next General Convention. No action is required of us.

2. We offer the following resolutions:

Resolved that Canon XXIV, Section 2, be amended by striking out the words "Obtain the written consent of the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "First obtain the written consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese."

Resolved: That the rules of order be amended by inserting in item 13 of Order of Business, after the words "Woman's Auxiliary," the words "Layman's League."

The Rev. David W. Yates reported for the Trustees of the University of the South.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH

The University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn., is the last college still owned by the Episcopal Church in the United States, excepting St. Augustine's, Raleigh. We formerly owned Columbia, Brown, and a number of other institutions of higher learning, but lost them through failure to give them financial support.

Sewanee is in the same danger. It is owned by the southern dioceses of the Episcopal Church and can survive only if those dioceses support it. The University is seeking to secure this support by asking that adequate appropriations be included in the several diocesan budgets and also that the parishes and missions have a "Sewanee Sunday" on which the offering shall be devoted to the maintenance of the University of the South. Our Diocese has taken a small step in this direction by including \$500 in the budget for 1939, but this is only a step. Each parish and mission is asked to conduct annually a Sewanee Sunday, on which the University is discussed and an offering for its support given. This is a splendid means of placing Sewanee before Episcopalians, who are mostly completely ignorant of the school they own.

Sewanee consists of three parts. There is a military preparatory school, a college of arts and sciences, and a theological seminary. By far the largest of these is the University. This is not a school for prospective students for the ministry. Less than ten per cent of the men who go there are even considering studying for the ministry. They are students such as go to any other college or university, with some just as good and some just as bad. There is, however, an unusually high calibre of average student. The University is much like Davidson College of this state.

Recently the Constitution of the University has been revised to place in the hands of a small board of about twelve regents, composed of Bishops, priests, and laymen, most of the powers formerly exercised by the Board of Trustees. This group numbers about one hundred, meets once a year, and is too unwieldy and not sufficiently informed to give as effective guidance to the University as can the Board of Regents. Accordingly the Trustees have delegated to the Regents, whom they elect, most of the powers necessary to the operation of the University, reserving to themselves the power of veto and of electing the chief officers of the institution.

On July 1st, 1938, a new Vice-Chancellor will take office. With his coming a new era will dawn for Sewanee. Dr. Finney for over fifteen years built the University up, and now an able successor is coming to build upon his foundations. Dr. Alexander Guerry, an alumnus, has resigned the presidency of the University of Chattanooga in order loyally to answer the call to serve Sewanee. Under his leadership the institution he is leaving grew and prospered. At Chattanooga Dr. Guerry demonstrated great ability as

a university head. Now he has sacrificed a high position and an exceedingly bright future to devote his talents and his life to help his Church to realize the great opportunity it has at Sewanee. If he is to be successful, he must have the support of every one of us and of all Episcopalians, the support that he so richly deserves.

One of the best ways in which you can help Sewanee is to send your sons there. We have many good colleges and universities in this state. Preparatory schools are more rare. But in both cases, it is the duty of Episcopal fathers to give first consideration to their own Church's institution when deciding where to send a son to school or to college. If we genuinely value the Church, its teaching, and its training, we should give our sons the advantages—increasingly rare—of an education amid Christian influences and environment. Sewanee is the last of our Church colleges that can offer this. Let us save it by whole-hearted support.

The Chair nominated as members of the Francis J. Murdoch Memorial Society the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence, the Rev. David W. Yates, Mr. F. O. Clarkson.

These nominations were confirmed by the convention.

A telegram of greeting from the Convention of East Carolina was received and read.

The secretary read the report of the Good Samaritan Hospital.

REPORT FOR 1937

For nearly fifty years the Good Samaritan Hospital has cared for the sick and suffering of the Negro race, and it is with genuine thankfulness that the hospital reports a most successful year in 1937.

The outstanding accomplishment of the year was the building and equipping of a modern Maternity Wing, which will amply take care of the maternity work of the hospital for years to come. Built along the most up-to-date lines, the new wing is equipped with the most advanced type of apparatus and furnishings.

Endeavoring at all times to maintain a Training School of high standard, the hospital enrolled twenty-two student nurses in 1937, graduating four nurses in April.

Without the support and generous gifts of its friends, the Good Samaritan Hospital could not have carried on, and it is with grateful appreciation that we thank the Duke Endowment, St. Peter's Church and others for their never failing interest and gifts.

APPENDIX A

ADDRESS AND JOURNAL OF THE BISHOP

Address of the Bishop

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

I welcome you to the 122nd Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina. We are meeting today amidst practically ideal surroundings. First, we are aware of the venerable traditions that cluster around this parish. Its history runs back to the early beginnings of our Diocesan organization. In the minutes of the 3rd Annual Convention that met in St. James Church, Wilmington, April 22nd, 1819, I find the following entry: "Application having been made by the Vestry of Trinity Church, Tarborough, to be admitted into union with this Convention, said Church, agreeably to the 3rd Article of the Constitution, was admitted." The Rev. John Phillips, rector of this parish, who was one of the four clergymen present, appeared and took his seat. There was no lay representation. Mr. Phillips reported to the Missionary society 10 communicants in the town of Tarborough. He had officiated at 6 baptisms and 9 funerals. The following year, 1820, the number of communicants had been reduced to 8. These were the days of small appearances but of mighty beginnings. The Journal of Bishop Ives for February 27, 1832 is more encouraging. He says: "I went to Tarborough, Edgecombe County, where I preached both morning and night of that and the following day, and confirmed 5 persons. The prospects of the Church here are good: prejudices against it are still strong, but the people are evidently becoming, through the judicious services of the missionary, daily more willing to hear and know the truth." It was at the convention of 1833 that the name Calvary Church was adopted instead of Trinity. It would be fascinating to turn the pages of the succeeding century and to trace the extraordinary expansion of this parish both in size and influence. The good prospects of which Bishop Ives spoke 106 years ago have been abundantly fulfilled. Today, Calvary Parish, Edgecombe County, is synonymous, not only with a sustained

missionary spirit but with aggressive missionary accomplishment. As we assemble here, we are also gratefully aware of the noble personalities that are forever associated with Calvary Church and the town of Tarboro. We think especially of Bishop Cheshire. Here he was born in 1850. Here he rests in the beautiful graveyard that his father before him had planted and beautified. Amidst these ideal surroundings, with the history of the past to inspire us and with the example of the present to encourage us, we meet to take counsel together of "the things pertaining to the Kingdom of God."

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NECROLOGY

In my Convention Address of last year, mention was made of the death of the Rev. Bertram Ervin Brown, retired Priest of the Diocese, on May 9, 1937. In this parish which he loved so devotedly and where he lavished his extraordinary powers with unsparing prodigality, it seems appropriate that we should recall once more our sense of gratitude that God should have adorned the history of this Diocese with the beauty of such a character. Meeting in the Church where his prophetic voice was heard for a quarter of a century, and in the heart of a county which his vision looked upon as a field white unto the harvest, we renew our thanks to God for the good example of this faithful servant whose ministry was heavy with the fruitage of a consecrated life.

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On March 10, 1938, at his home in Charlotte, whither he had removed after his retirement as rector of Christ Church, Raleigh, the Reverend Milton Augustus Barber, S. T. D., Priest, was stricken suddenly and fell asleep. Dr. Barber was a native of this state, born in Hyde County in 1869. He received his education at Hobart College and the General Theological Seminary. After brief rectorships in the Dioceses of East Carolina and Texas, he came to St. Athanasius Church, now the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, in 1905. Two years later,

he accepted the call to Christ Church, Raleigh, where he worked with loyalty and effectiveness until his retirement, on account of failing health, in 1935. Dr. Barber was a builder. To whatever work he set his hand, he devoted a rare gift of sustained energy that drove his vision to accomplishment. In the Councils of the Church, as President of the Standing Committee, as Trustee of several Institutions, as deputy to nine General Conventions, Dr. Barber's word was respected. We shall miss his simple ruggedness, his bracing convictions, his unflinching sense of justice always tempered with kindness.

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SUMMARY OF OFFICIAL ACTS

The Journal of my Official Acts may be briefly summarized. Within the Diocese I made 101 visitations, celebrated the Holy Communion 31 times, officiated at 47 other services, 10 funerals, 5 weddings, and 10 baptisms. I confirmed 648 persons, of which number 69 were Negroes and 6 were members of our Deaf congregations. I ordained one Candidate for Holy Orders to the Diaconate and advanced one Deacon to the Priesthood. I consecrated 3 Church buildings, laid the cornerstone of one new Church, took part in the dedication of a hospital and made an address when the Greek Bishop visited Raleigh and laid the cornerstone of a new Church building. I issued licenses to 42 Lay Readers, attended 60 committee and trustee meetings, held 141 conferences, preached 85 times and delivered 59 lectures and addresses. During the year, I dedicated a number of memorials and miscellaneous gifts.

Outside the Diocese, I attended a three-day conference in Birmingham under the auspices of the Forward Movement Commission, officiated at one funeral, preached 3 times and made 2 addresses. For two weeks in October, I was in attendance at every session of the House of Bishops at the General Convention at Cincinnati.

There is only one item in this array of statistics upon which it may be necessary to comment. The number of

persons confirmed was 648, which is the record of my Episcopate for any one year. This represents a gain in our communicant strength in 1937 of 5.1%. The largest number presented for confirmation in any one Church was 50, in Christ Church, Raleigh.

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CLERICAL CHANGES

Additions to the clergy of the Diocese by ordination were as follows: On June 25th, in the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, I advanced to the Priesthood the Rev. Ralph Andrew Bridges, Deacon; on July 4th, in St. Philip's Church, Durham, I ordained to the Diaconate, Robert Macbeth Bird, Candidate for Holy Orders.

We have also acquired two new Priests by transfer from other Dioceses: on September 1st, the Rev. Leicester Foulk Kent from West Virginia and on December 23rd the Rev. Jesse Starnes Lockaby from Western North Carolina. To these new clergymen we extend a cordial and affectionate greeting.

Our losses last year exceeded our gains. On January 1st the Rev. Andrew Dallam Milstead relinquished his charge of Trinity Church, Statesville and St. James, Iredell County to accept a position in the Diocese of Upper South Carolina. On March 8th, the Bishop of New York accepted Letter Dimissory for the Rev. Ernest McGerson Winborne who had gone to that Diocese the year before. On August 30th, the Rev. Odell Greenleaf Harris was transferred to the Diocese of Southern Virginia. On September 1st, the Rev. Henry Johnston, Jr. removed to the Diocese of Alabama. All four of these young men were North Carolinians and were trained for the ministry as Candidates from this Diocese. Two of them, Mr. Johnston and Mr. Harris, were drawn away from us by the opportunity to work among students. We temper our regrets in losing them with the satisfaction that this Diocese is contributing to the larger work of the Church. Despite these losses and others which we have suffered

since the first of this year, I am happy to report that by the middle of June, all vacancies in the Diocese will be filled with the exception of one important Negro field.

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FIELDS OF LABOR

The clergy of the Diocese are working in the same fields as reported last year with the following numerous exceptions:

January 1st, the Rev. Andrew D. Milstead resigned his charge at Trinity Church, Statesville and St. James, Iredell County, and removed to the Diocese of Upper South Carolina. This vacancy was filled on July 4th, when the Rev. Robert M. Bird, Deacon, was ordained and assigned to this field.

March 1st, the Rev. John F. Hamaker relinquished his work at Trinity Church, Mount Airy and Galloway Memorial, Elkin. These Churches remained vacant until January 1st of this year when the Rev. Frank D. Dean, formerly of St. Timothy's Parish, Wilson, became Priest in Charge.

May 12th, the Rev. Edwin W. Hurst resigned as Priest in Charge of St. Stephen's, Erwin upon the elevation of this Mission to the status of a Parish. He continued his services in Erwin, however, until August 9th, and on September 1st became temporarily Priest in Charge of the Church of the Messiah, Rockingham, and All Saints, Hamlet.

August 30th, the Rev. Odell G. Harris resigned as Priest in Charge of All Saints', Warrenton; St. Luke's, Warren County and St. Anna's, Littleton, to accept the call to the Wardenship of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Va. This field remains vacant until this day.

September 1st, the Rev. Henry Johnston, Jr., attracted by the opportunity for working among college students at the University of Alabama, resigned as Priest in Charge of St. Andrews' Church, Charlotte, and St. Mark's Church, Mecklenburg County. He was succeeded on De-

ember 23rd by the Rev. Jesse Starnes Lockaby from the Diocese of Western North Carolina.

As of this date, the clergy of the Diocese, in addition to the Bishop, are classified as follows: Active, 58 Priests, Deacons 1, Retired Priests 4, Non-parochial 2. There are 6 Candidates for Holy Orders, and 2 Postulants.

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OLD AGE SECURITY

I call the attention of this Convention to the matter of old age security for lay employees of the Church. On our diocesan staff, on the faculties of our Church institutions and in parochial employ are hundreds of men and women who earn their living in whole or in part by their services to the Church and for whose disability or old age no provision has been made.

In 1934 General Convention affirmed: "That social insurance against such modern industrial hazards and economic insecurities as unemployment, illness, accident and old age is in accord with every principle of Christian brotherhood and is endorsed."

Under the provisions of the Social Security Act, the following exemption appears:—

"Service performed in the employ of a corporation, community chest, fund, or foundation, organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes, or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals, no part of the net earnings of which inures to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual."

Last fall the General Convention took cognizance of this exemption of laymen and laywomen employed by the Church from the benefits of the Social Security Act and passed the following resolution:

"Resolved, That General Convention strongly recommends to the Dioceses, Parishes, Missions, institutions and other organizations of the Church that immediate consideration be given by such units of the Church to the purchase of retirement contracts

to provide benefits for all lay employees, and calls attention to retirement policies available for this purpose with the Church Life Insurance Corporation, a subsidiary of the Church Pension Fund, and with other insurance companies.”

I, therefore, recommend that this Convention create a Special Committee to make a thorough study of this whole matter of old age security for lay employees of the Church in this Diocese and to report their findings to the Convention of 1939.

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MISSIONARY STRATEGY AND EVALUATION

One of the primary responsibilities of this Convention is the welfare of our Diocesan missionary work. Under our present form of organization, this work is administered by the Bishop and the Department of Missions of the Executive Council. Of the 59 active clergy of this Diocese, 38 are now devoting part or all of their time to one or more missions. Including both White and Negro work, the Diocese supplements the salaries of 22 men and one woman. In 1937, the Department of Missions spent \$22,707.36. This is a considerable sum of money to be spent annually on one phase of our Church's Program. The Convention is entitled to inquire whether or not this money is being spent wisely and to the best advantage. I have already reported 648 Confirmations in 1937. Of this number 498 persons were confirmed in independent Parishes or missions and 150 in Churches that are subsidized by Diocesan funds. In other words, at an expenditure of \$22,707.36, the communicant strength of the Church in North Carolina was increased by 150, or at a net cost to the Diocese of approximately \$150 for each new communicant. These figures are startling enough to justify an inquiry into the wisdom of our strategy. If the Diocese had unlimited funds with which to maintain its existing work and also to develop new opportunities for expansion as they arose, it would not be necessary to question the policy of carrying on substan-

tially the same work, in the same way, from year to year. But we do not have unlimited funds at our disposal. Hence the difficult question of evaluating this work. Should we continue to subsidize missions that are practically static, where conditions have changed since the work was begun years ago, where populations have shifted or moved away and where the chances of reasonable growth are very slender? Or, should we reduce or withdraw Diocesan support from such places and apply it to more promising fields in growing centers of population where opportunities for expansion are far more favorable? These questions require wisdom and sympathy and vision and courage to answer. They involve a serious and far-reaching policy. The welfare of the Church of the future is vitally concerned. Strategy means planning. Evaluation means emphasis. Sentiment enters into the determination of these things, and properly. So does realism and practical judgment. So complicated is the whole problem that I would welcome and recommend the appointment by this Convention of a Diocesan Committee on Strategy and Evaluation of our entire missionary structure, to make their studies independently of the Executive Council, and at the conclusion of their research, to submit their findings and recommendations to that body for their guidance in prosecuting the missionary program within this Diocese.

* * * * *

CONCLUSION

I cannot close this address without referring, most inadequately, to certain phases of our Diocesan life that impel one to feelings of gratitude to God and of optimism regarding the future of the Church. I refer to the personnel of the clergy whose loyalty stands sure and whose professional efficiency continues to grow as the demands by the public upon the ministry increase from year to year. I refer to that army of volunteer teachers in our Church Schools, counsellors of college students and Young People, leaders of Camps and Conferences, who

are moulding the ideas and attitudes of the rising generation of Churchmen. I am thinking of the consecrated labors of the Woman's Auxiliary, of the expanding influence of the Laymen's League, of the consistently efficient management of our several Church Institutions. I rejoice in the encouraging revival of dormant work such as St. John's, Madison and St. Timothy's, Union County, and the beginnings of new life at such places as Knollhurst, Albemarle and Asheboro. For these and all other evidences of the fulfillment of Christ's promise to be with His Church, we give Him unfeigned thanks. We are not citizens of a ready-made world. We are citizens of a kingdom whose task and honor it is to remake the world as co-laborers with Him who has called us to "the inheritance of the saints in light."

Official Acts of the Bishop

- Jan. 1. The resignation of the Rev. Andrew Dallam Milstead, Priest in Charge of Trinity Church, Statesville, and St. James' Church, Iredell County, becomes effective today. Mr. Milstead has been a good workman in this field since his ordination in 1931. He becomes rector of the Good Shepherd Church, York, S. C. Our affectionate interest follows him.
- Jan. 3. St. Paul's Church, Monroe. I made a short talk to the Church School.
11 a.m. In the same Church, I celebrated the Holy Communion, preached, and confirmed seven persons.
3:30 p.m. Trinity Mission, Monroe. The Rev. John W. Herritage, D.D. read Evening Prayer, and following the sermon, presented three candidates for Confirmation. Since my last visit, the interior of this new church building has been improved by the installation of the pews that used to be in old St. Paul's Church, Goshen, which was torn down last year.
- Jan. 6. At the Security National Bank, Raleigh, I presided today at a meeting of the Trustees of the Diocese in conference with Mr. J. M. Sink, Jr., Custodian.
- Jan. 7. 11:30 a.m. Wilrik Hotel, Sanford. At a meeting of the Standing Committee, I presented a schedule of appropriations under the Lawrence S. Holt Trust Fund for 1937. The necessity of maintaining missionaries' salaries' at their present standard excluded all building items for this year, much to our regret.
8 p.m. Ravenscroft. I conferred with Mr. Stephen E. Burroughs, Chairman of the Finance Department, and Mr. A. L. Purrington, Jr., Trustee, concerning the maintenance of Diocesan property.
- Jan. 8. 9:30 a.m. Ravenscroft. Met with the Department of Finance.
11 a.m. I presided at the regular quarterly meeting of the Diocesan Executive Council. The Rev. David T. Eaton, Chairman of the Field Department, submitted a gratifying report on the results of the fall canvass for the support of The Church's Program. A budget for the year was tentatively adopted, subject to final adjustment at the April meeting. The "Expectation" of this Diocese of \$15,000 for the work of the National Council was reported paid in full for 1936, and for 1937 was increased to \$16,000. There were other evidences of the sustained interest of this Diocese in missionary support.

- Jan. 10. All Saints' Church, Concord. The Rev. Israel Harding Hughes read Morning Prayer. I preached, received one person from the Roman Catholic Church and confirmed five others.
- 4 p.m. Holy Cross Mission, Statesville. I preached and confirmed two candidates presented by the Rev. John W. Herritage, D.D. After service, I conferred with Mr. John A. Price, Senior Warden of Trinity Church, Statesville, now vacant.
- Jan. 12-13. These two days were uneventful except for conferences at Ravenscroft with the Rev. Henry F. Kroman and the Rev. Frank D. Dean.
- Jan. 15. In conference with the Trustees of the Diocese, we decided to rent the rectory of St. Paul's Church, Smithfield. Since Mr. Clarkson went to Texas last December, this Church has been served by the Rev. Edwin W. Hurst of Erwin.
- Jan. 17. 11 a.m. St. Andrew's Church, Greensboro. Morning Prayer was read by the Rev. Jean A. Vaché, Rector. The second lesson was signed by the Rev. Roma C. Fortune. Mr. Vaché presented eight persons for Confirmation one of whom was from Grace Church, Lexington. Mr. Fortune presented two candidates. Mr. James Fortune interpreted my sermon in the sign language.
- 6:45 p.m. St. Mary's House, Greensboro. I installed the new officers of St. Mary's Club, made a short talk and confirmed three students of the Woman's College University of North Carolina.
- Jan. 18. 3 p.m. Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington. I took part in the funeral service of Mr. Lawrence S. Holt with the Rector, the Rev. David T. Eaton and the Rt. Rev. Robert E. Gribbin, D.D. The Rev. Roma C. Fortune was also in the chancel. In the death of Mr. Holt the Church has lost an earnest layman and one of the most liberal benefactors in American Church history.
- Jan. 19. 1 p.m. At the Sir Walter Hotel, Raleigh, I presided at a luncheon meeting of a Special Committee of St. Augustine's Board of Trustees.
- Jan. 21. 7 p.m. Virginia Theological Seminary, Alexandria, Va. I addressed the students and faculty. During the evening I had the satisfaction of conferring with Robert M. Man, Charles U. Harris, Jr., and Wm. Penn Price, the three Seminary students from this diocese, all of whom are doing well.
- Jan. 22. 10 a.m. I addressed the student body of the Virginia Seminary again.

- Jan. 24. 11 a.m. St. Bartholomew's Church, Pittsboro. The Rev. Royal G. Shannonhouse, Rector, read Morning Prayer and I preached. I drove with Mr. and Mrs. Shannonhouse to Asheboro. There, at 3:30 p.m., in the Chapel of Poole's Funeral Home, I made my first official visit to the Good Shepherd Mission. Mr. Shannonhouse stated that this was the first episcopal visit by any Bishop of this Church in Randolph County. Despite rainy weather, a good sized congregation was present, including the ministers of the four leading churches of Asheboro, a courtesy and brotherliness that I appreciated. After service, in company with Mr. Shannonhouse and Mr. Cleveland Thayer, one of the zealous laymen of this new congregation, I inspected the Church lot where building operations are about to begin. Later in the home of Mrs. Hammond, I attended a congregational gathering. Returning to Pittsboro, I enjoyed an informal social hour with some members of St. Bartholomew's parish at the home of Mr. London.
- Jan. 26. 4 p.m. Good Shepherd Church, Rocky Mount. At a special visitation I confirmed two persons presented by the Rev. Francis H. Craighill.
- Jan. 27. 8 p.m. In the Chapel of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial School, Raleigh, I conducted a brief service and spoke to the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Augustine's Chapel congregation.
- Jan. 28. 11 a.m. In the library of St. Mary's School, Raleigh, I presided at a meeting of the Trustees of this Institution. Though no quorum was present, the forenoon was profitably spent in discussing future policies.
- Jan. 29. 3:30 p.m. I presided at a meeting of the Trustees of the Diocese held at the Security National Bank, Raleigh, and later, in the same place, I met with the investment committee of St. Augustine's Board of Trustees.
- Jan. 30. 4 p.m. The Church of the Ascension, Davie County. Following a brief service conducted by the Rev. C. Earle B. Robinson, I made an address and confirmed nine persons, the largest class, if my memory is correct, that I have ever confirmed in this rural mission.
- 6:30 p.m. I attended a congregational supper meeting in the Parish House of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Cooleemee which was full of interest and encouragement on account of the good reports of the several Mission officers. Mrs. Margaret S. Green, nurse in charge, showed me through the Clinic that was started a few years ago by the Rev. Norvin C. Duncan.

- Jan. 31. 9 a.m. Church of the Good Shepherd, Cooleemee. I celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by Mr. Robinson, preached and confirmed 4 persons.
- 11 a.m. St. George's Church, Woodleaf. Morning Prayer was read by Mr. Robinson. I preached and confirmed one person. This was my first service in this church since its renovation in honor of the Rev. Wm. H. Hardin, one time Priest in Charge. Following a conversation with Mr. Robinson, I appointed him Chairman of the Diocesan Rural Commission to succeed the Rev. Andrew D. Milstead, resigned.
- Feb. 1. Effective this date, the Rev. Henry Johnston, Jr., relinquishes his position as Priest in Charge of the Chapel of Hope, Charlotte. The Rev. Willis G. Clark, rector of St. Peter's Parish, will resume his care of this mission. Mr. Johnston will continue to minister at St. Andrew's, Wesley Heights and St. Mark's, Mecklenburg County.

Journal of Proceedings

FIRST DAY

Raleigh, N. C., May 9, 1939

The one hundred and twenty-third annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina was held in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, N. C., beginning Tuesday, May 9 at 9:30 a. m.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. James M. Dick and the Bishop.

At 10:15 the Bishop called the convention to order. The secretary on the basis of registration at the door and by actual count certified that a quorum was present in both orders, and the Bishop declared the convention duly organized. On nomination the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence was elected secretary. He appointed the Rev. Daniel W. Allen as his assistant.

The Rev. James M. Dick welcomed the convention to the parish.

The Bishop read a letter from Mr. Graham H. Andrews, Senior Warden, expressing his regret at being unable to be present, and welcoming the convention both as warden and as mayor.

On motion of the Rev. John L. Jackson, the secretary was instructed to write Mr. Andrews a letter of appreciation.

On motion the printed program was adopted as the schedule of the convention.

The chair recognized Rev. Dr. William H. Milton. On motion Dr. Milton was granted an honorary seat in the convention and the privilege of the floor.

The Bishop then called the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes to the chair, and read his annual address.

(See Appendix A).

The Bishop resumed the chair, and presented to the Convention the new clergy: the Rev. Messrs. Edward B. Guerry, Louis A. Haskell, C. Alfred Cole, Robert M. Man, Charles U. Harris, Jr., James D. Beckwith, and Gray Temple.

Mr. Jos. B. Cheshire read the report of the Standing Committee. (Page 124).

Mr. A. L. Purrington, Jr., read the report of the Trustees of the Diocese. (Page 126).

This report was referred to a special committee, consisting of Kemp D. Battle, David L. Gallagher, and Samuel J. Hinsdale.

The Chancellor, Mr. Alexander B. Andrews, read his report. (Page 128).

The Bishop then recognized the Rev. Wm. J. Gordon, who presented the application of St. Luke's, Spray, to be admitted as a parish. The application was referred to the Committee on new parishes.

The report of the Executive Council was read by the Rev. Frank E. Pulley. (Page 129).

This report was supplemented by reports from the different departments; Rev. John L. Jackson reported for the Dept. of Christian Social service; Rev. M. George Henry for the Dept. of Field and Publicity; the Rev. James M. Dick for the Dept. of Religious Education; the Rev. Wm. S. Turner for the Dept. of Missions.

Mr. J. S. Holmes moved that the rules of order be suspended and that the representative for the American Bible Society be given time in the afternoon to present the cause of the Society to the Convention. Carried.

Mr. Stephen E. Burroughs presented the budget for 1940. The budget for Episcopal Maintenance, amounting to \$12,357.50, was adopted. (The Budget is printed as a whole on page 121). Action on the budget for the Church's Program was deferred until further matters dealing with finance should be brought before the Convention.

The Chair appointed a Committee on New Parishes as follows: Rev. David T. Eaton, Urban T. Holmes, John H. Cutter, J. A. Mackie.

Dr. Lawrence F. London presented his report as historiographer. (Page 131).

The hour of noon having arrived, the Bishop led the Convention in prayers for missions.

Nominations were then made as in the rules of order.

The Rev. David W. Yates offered a resolution that the president of the Y. P. S. L. be the representative of the League on the Executive Council. The matter was referred to the Committee on Canons.

Mr. Alexander B. Andrews moved that a committee of five be appointed to study the arrears of certain churches in the matter of the Pension Fund, and to report back to the Convention. Carried. The chair appointed the following committee: Rev. R. G. Shannonhouse, Rev. I. H. Hughes, Rev. John L. Jackson, Arthur H. London, Alexander B. Andrews.

A recess was then taken. Lunch was served to the delegates at St. Mary's School. At the luncheon, the Rev. John L. Jackson moved a resolution of thanks to the authorities of the school for their hospitality.

The Convention reassembled at 2:30 p. m.

Mr. W. W. Narramore addressed the convention on the work of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

The Rev. I. S. McElroy addressed the Convention on the work of the American Bible Society.

The Rev. M. George Henry presented the report of the Committee on the State of the Church. (Page 132).

The chair recognized the presence in the Convention of Miss Laura Clark, missionary to China, and presented her to the Convention.

The Bishop also presented Miss Lillie Hill, who has just completed 25 years of faithful missionary service in Rockingham County.

The Rev. D. T. Eaton presented the report of the Committee on New Parishes.

Your Committee on New Parishes has examined the credentials presented by St. Luke's mission, Spray, under Canon 21 and find them complete and in good order. In recommending that the application be accepted and that St. Luke's Mission, Spray be admitted into union with the Diocese as a parish we trust that the delegates of this convention are deeply sensible of the great significance of this latest member of our parochial family. This hour represents the fruition of many years of devoted labor on the part of a great missionary family, the Gordons, to whom we render our grateful homage.

The report was accepted by a standing vote, and the doxology was sung.

The Secretary called the roll of delegates of St. Luke's Parish, Spray, and the following answered and took their seats: Martin W. Hayden, Peter W. Robertson, Tommie Dewey Pulliam, and Alfred Hodgson.

The chair announced the regular committees as printed on page 7.

The Rev. D. P. Moore moved that greetings be sent to the Rev. Jos. N. Bynum. Carried.

Mr. Henry M. London presented the report of the treasurers. (See Appendix B).

The Rev. John L. Jackson made a supplementary report.

The Rev. Henry F. Kloman spoke on the work of St. Mary's School.

Mr. Alexander B. Andrews reported for the Special Committee on Pension Arrears as follows:

The Special Committee on Arrears to the Church Pension Fund met following their appointment, organized by electing Rev. Royal G. Shannonhouse, St. Bartholomew's Church, Pittsboro, N. C., as Chairman, reviewed the statistics already assembled, and make the following verbal report:

The Church Pension Fund shows that it averages \$99.50 collections out of each \$100 of assessments for pensions. In North Carolina, up to December 31, 1937, the collections had been \$188,000 in round figures, and the arrearages were \$1,540.04, which is 75c arrearage out of each \$100 charged on the books of the Pension Fund. This was owed by 17 congregations on 14 clergymen. Since then, 2 congregations have paid, so it is now owed by 15 congregations on 12 clergymen.

The Church Pension Fund account is individually with the clergyman, although the remittances may come from one, two, or more congregations. In the case of two congregations, the failure of one to pay leaves the Pension Fund for that year not fully paid and the account delinquent. A small arrearage may virtually nullify the substantial payment made by the principal congregation.

Of the 12 clergymen, 5 are at work in our midst, while 7 have removed to other Dioceses, yet their unpaid accounts in North Carolina congregations are a charge and a blot upon our Pension Fund payments.

Your Special Committee requests the indulgence of the Convention that they may sit during its session, assemble the facts, make

plain to the congregations and clergy involved the necessity of prompt action, and file and have published in the Proceedings a tabulation of the arrearages. Also, that there should be printed the detail as to the payments made by the Diocese to the Fund, and the benefits received by the clergy, the widows, and the dependents.

The report of the Woman's Auxiliary was read by the former president, Mrs. W. J. Gordon. (Page 133).

The report of the Y. P. S. L. was presented by W. J. Gordon, Jr. (Page 135).

The report of the Managers of the Thompson Orphanage was read by the Rev. John L. Jackson. (Page 137).

The report of St. Augustine's College was read by Mr. J. B. Cheshire. (Page 138).

Mr. Hobart T. Steele presented the report of the Layman's League. (Page 141).

The report on College work was read by the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence. (Page 142).

The report of the Murdoch Society was read by the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence. (Page 142).

The Bishop nominated as members of the Society for a term of two years the Rev. R. Bruce Owens, the Rev. I. Harding Hughes and Wm. H. Hardin. The Convention confirmed these nominations.

The report of the Examining Chaplains was read by the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence. (Page 143).

The report of the Church Pension Fund was presented by the Rev. Robert E. Roe and Ralph B. Coit. (Page 143).

The report of the North Carolina Churchman was presented by the Rev. Frank E. Pulley. (Page 148).

The Rev. John A. Wright presented the following report.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED ON THE NORTH CAROLINA CHURCHMAN

Your committee begs to submit the following recommendations, all of them to be effective January 1, 1940:

1. That the North Carolina Churchman be published once a month for ten months of the year, each issue to be of twelve pages.
2. That the remuneration of the editor remain as it is, but that he be relieved of some of his duties by the appointment of an advertising manager to work on a commission basis.

3. That the subscription price of one dollar a year be abandoned.

4. That each Parish or Mission send to the circulation manager a mailing list of all the families and the individuals not thus included in families in each congregation. At the same time the Vestry of each Parish or Mission shall guarantee to the North Carolina Churchman 25c per year for each mailed into the congregation.

5. That an additional \$1,000.00 be placed in the Diocesan budget to underwrite the additional expenses incurred. However, it is the belief of your committee that by increasing the circulation to four or five thousand copies per issue the plan as outlined above will prove to be entirely self sustaining, that is to say, it will take care of all additional expenses beyond those now provided for in the budget. Your committee is also of the opinion, however, that this plan will work only if all Parishes and Missions participate in it and a minimum circulation of four thousand be secured.

The Rev. Robert Bruce Owens of the committee on canons presented a report. (Page 31).

By resolution action on this report was made the special order for Wednesday, after the first ballot.

The Rev. Frank E. Pulley offered a resolution, which was adopted, expressing the sympathy of the Convention to the Rev. John L. Jackson in the death of his brother.

A recess was taken at 5 p. m.

At 8 p. m. the Convention reassembled for a special service. The Bishop preached the sermon, and the offerings of the congregation were received for the N. Y. Bible and Common Prayer Book Society.

WEDNESDAY

May 10, 1939

The Holy Communion was celebrated in the Church of the Good Shepherd at 7:30 a. m. with the Bishop as celebrant assisted by the Rector, the Rev. James M. Dick.

At 9:30 a. m. Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. James M. Dick and the Bishop.

At 10 a. m. the Bishop called the Convention to order and the minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

The Rev. James M. Dick extended an invitation to the Convention to attend a luncheon in the Parish House of the Church of the Good Shepherd.

The report of the work among the deaf was signed by the Rev. R. C. Fortune and read by the Rev. Robert M. Man. (Page 148).

The ballots were then distributed. In regard to the motion offered by the Rev. David W. Yates on the preceding day, the Committee on Canons reported as follows:

We have considered the amendment to Canon XVII, suggested orally by Rev. Mr. Yates, and dealing with the representation of the Y. P. S. L. on the Diocesan Council.

After a conference with leaders of the Y. P. S. L., we advise no amendment be made to the Canon, but that the President of the Y. P. S. L. be given a seat and a voice, but not a vote in the meetings of the Executive Council. This will accomplish the purpose desired by said leaders, and we ask to be discharged from further consideration of the matter.

This report was adopted. The Rev. David W. Yates then nominated Miss Curlena Godfrey as representative of the Y. P. S. L. on the Executive Council.

The Bishop appointed as tellers The Rev. James D. Beckwith, Charles R. Wall, Rev. Ralph A. Bridges, and Ruffin Smith.

On motion, the rules were suspended, and the secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the Convention for those nominees where there was no contest. Mr. Henry M. London offered the following resolution which was adopted:

RESOLVED: That in the event of there being no election on the first ballot for any place to be voted on, then on the next and any subsequent ballots only twice the number of nominees for places to be filled be voted on, chosen from those highest in order on the preceding ballot.

The Rev. Willis G. Clark asked for the floor under personal privilege. He requested all those who had served in the 1922 Convention to come forward and while the rest of the Convention stood, he congratulated the Dio-

cese on its choice of a Bishop and he called the Convention to silent prayer for further guidance.

Rev. R. B. Owens presented the report of the Committee on Canons and offered the resolutions attached.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS

Your Committee on Canons respectfully reports that it has carefully considered the resolution offered at the Convention of 1938 by Mr. J. S. Holmes, and recorded on page 56 of the Journal of that year as follows:

“Resolved that the Committee on Canons be requested to prepare and present to the Convention an amendment to Canon XXII dealing with Vestries so that women may be eligible to election on vestries.”

In accordance with the request of the Convention we offer the following resolution “Resolved, that Canon XXII, Sec. 1, be amended by striking out the word ‘male’ in line four, and also in line ten.”

It is the judgment of your Committee that this proposed change would be unwise, and therefore advise that it be defeated.

II

We offer the following resolution:

“Resolved that Art. IX, Sec. 3 of the Constitution be amended (1) by striking out the word ‘males’ in line 2, and substituting therefor the words ‘baptized persons,’ and (2) by striking out the two provisions in the last paragraph of the same section.”

III

Resolved: That Canon XVII, Sec. 3, be amended by striking out the words “and the department of missions and church extension” at the end thereof.

IV

Resolved that Canon XXIII, Sec. 2 be amended by striking out the entire section and substituting therefor the following:

Sec. 2. Within thirty days after the Bishop has been notified that a Parish is vacant, he shall nominate to the vestry thereof four clergymen from among whom the vestry shall elect a rector. But if the Vestry should not agree on the election of any one of these four, the Bishop shall then nominate four other clergy to them, and this procedure shall continue until the Vestry shall have elected a rector.

V

Among the matters referred to us, was a proposed additional “Sec. 5” to Canon XXIII as follows: “In case of a vacancy in an organized mission or an aided parish the Bishop shall appoint the

Rector or minister in charge for a term of not more than four years; at the end of the four years the vestry of said aided parish may request the re-appointment of the Rector."

Your Committee has been unable in this short time at their disposal to arrive at a satisfactory definition of an "aided Parish," and therefore asks permission to report on this amendment at the next Convention.

Resolution 1 after considerable discussion was defeated. Resolutions 2 and 3 were adopted. Resolution 4 was referred back to the Committee at their request.

Mr. A. L. Purrington, Jr., requested the Committee on Canons to clarify the situation as to the power of the trustees to convey property. The Chairman of the Committee on Canons asked that the trustees draw up such legislation as they thought needed and present it to the Committee on Canons for consideration. It was so agreed.

On motion of the Rev. Willis G. Clark, Resolution 3 of the report of the Committee on Canons was reconsidered. After further discussion, on motion it was again adopted.

The report on Vade Mecum was given by the Rev. A. Stratton Lawrence, Jr. (Page 149).

The report of the Lay Trustee of Kanuga was read by Mr. John S. Holmes. (Page 153).

Mr. Stephen E. Burroughs presented the following:

The Finance Department of the Executive Council, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Council at its last meeting, has considered the advisability of consolidating the three Treasuries of the Diocese and the Secretaryship of the Convention. After discussion, the following recommendations are made:

First: That the Diocese discontinue the collection of assessments for the Church Pension Fund, through its own Committee or Treasurer, in accordance with the recommendation of the Headquarters of the Pension Fund that remittances for Pension Premiums be made by the Treasurers of Parishes and Missions directly to the New York office of the Church Pension Fund.

Second: That the present office of Secretary of the Convention be continued without change.

Third: That the Diocese adopt the plan of a single treasurer for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund, and for the Church's Program Fund; that a Diocesan Treasurer be elected at a salary of \$1,000.00 per year, and that the Executive Council be authorized to make provision for the expenses of his office.

Fourth: That the salary of the Treasurer and expenses of his office be allocated one-third to the Episcopal Maintenance Fund, and two-thirds to the Church's Program Fund.

After discussion, the Rev. William S. Turner offered as a substitute:

RESOLVED: That the Executive Council continue its study and make further plans for the consolidation of such Diocesan offices as seem advisable, and for the creation of a Diocesan office in Raleigh, and to consider the whole matter of bringing about greater efficiency, economy, and better business management in the administration of the affairs of the Diocese and Convention and to report at the 124th Convention.

The substitute was adopted.

A telegram of greeting from the Convention of Western North Carolina was received and read.

Mr. A. L. Purrington, Jr., told the Convention that the Trustees were anxious to know of any mission property.

The report of the Trustees under the will of General William A. Smith was made by Mr. W. L. Marshall, Jr. (Page 156).

Mr. R. E. Little moved that the Trustees of the Diocese and the trustees under the will be authorized to seek a court ruling to construe the will, especially as to whether or not the time element be contrary to public policy.

After discussion, the motion carried.

On motion of the Rev. Frank E. Pulley, it was agreed that all properties managed by the Trustees under the will of Gen. W. A. Smith should be known as "The Smith Vocational Trust."

Mr. Kemp D. Battle presented the report of the special committee to which the report of the Trustees had been referred.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER REPORT OF
TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESE

The undersigned committee respectfully report that we have given to the report of the Trustees of the Diocese such considera-

tion and examination as were practicable within existing limitations of time and opportunity. We find that the plan of operation authorized by the Convention at its meeting in Warrenton whereby Security National Bank was appointed custodian of endowment funds with consolidated investments and whereby a survey of Diocesan property was to be followed by systematic fire insurance coverage has been put into successful operation. A yield of 4.4462% on the consolidated trust investments is highly satisfactory under present conditions and has been achieved, so far as we can judge, without undue risk of capital.

The property of the Diocese is inventoried, scheduled, and insured in a systematic manner with separate record as to each item of real estate. The cost will henceforth be less than in the past although the aggregate coverage greatly exceeds the protection afforded by the haphazard methods heretofore in use. The payment of the annual premiums, however, presents a problem requiring a definite and firm policy on the part of the Diocese. Fifty Missions are delinquent in sums ranging from \$2.55 to \$205.86, and totalling in excess of \$2,000. The Diocese must: (1) Abandon the principle of keeping all buildings insured; or (2) Provide itself for the cost of insurance; or (3) Take steps to enforce payment of insurance by the missions using the property. In some cases, property is being rented and the income is being spent without providing for insurance. If we drift, the delinquencies will soon become unmanageable. We therefore recommend:

1. That the Trustees be authorized to protect the note given for premiums with any unpledged funds at their disposal, with power to make renewals thereof.

2. That the trustees be authorized to take charge of and collect rentals from all income-producing real estate when such property is delinquent as to insurance premiums.

3. That all payments to the Diocesan Treasurer from a Mission using property delinquent as to such premiums be applied by the Treasurer to removing such delinquencies before application to the Episcopal Maintenance Fund or the Church's Program Fund.

4. That the Trustees be directed to make periodical reports of insurance delinquencies to the Executive Council for consideration by the Department of Missions and Church Extension in connection with its appropriations for missions.

As to the controversy which has arisen concerning the administration of the fund built up by the Ladies Aid Society, we believe that this matter should be brought to an expeditious settlement. We therefore recommend:

5. That the Bishop be authorized to appoint a committee of three laymen to consider the matter and hear witnesses; that the

Trustees be authorized to make such settlement with the former custodian of this fund as such committee may approve.

We further recommend:

6. That the request of the Trustees that their accounts be annually audited be granted and that the chairman of the Finance Dept. of the Executive Council be authorized to select an auditor and fix his compensation, to be paid by the Trustees from any unpledged funds in their hands.

7. That the Convention endorse this principle that property which is not being used for Church purposes, and as to which there appears to be no likelihood of such use within a reasonable time, be sold and that the Trustees, acting under authority which they already possess, proceed to make such sales in their discretion and defray the reasonable expenses thereof; that a list of properties deemed suitable for sale be furnished to the Executive Council for consideration by the Department of Missions and Church Extension in connection with its missionary program.

8. That the report of the Trustees be accepted with the thanks of the Convention.

The report of the Trustees was then adopted.

Mr. Hal A. London then offered the following report for the Committee on Social Security for Lay Employees:

The committee after making a survey do not think they have sufficient information to justify a recommendation that a plan for retirement of Lay Employees be adopted and ask that the Committee be continued for further report at next Convention.

The report was adopted and the committee continued.

The Bishop nominated the Board of Examining Chaplains as follows: Rev. Messrs. R. Bruce Owens, Alfred S. Lawrence, Edgar H. Goold, F. Craighill Brown, B. N. Defoe Wagner. The nominations were confirmed by the convention.

The report of the Lenten offering was presented by the Rev. John Q. Beckwith, Jr. (Page 156).

The tellers reported, and the elections were announced as follows:

Mr. Stephen E. Burroughs then presented the budget for the Church's Program. Amendments were offered increasing the amount for salary of Director of Religious Education and for underwriting the North Carolina Churchman. The budget so amended was adopted. (Page 122).

Mr. Burroughs called the attention of the Convention to the fact that in 1940 no help would be received for Negro work from the National Council.

The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes took the chair and the Bishop submitted by title the Report of St. Mary's School and Junior College. He commented briefly on a few points in the report. (Page 157).

The Bishop resumed the chair and the Rev. H. F. Kroman offered the following resolution:

RESOLVED: That a committee be appointed to investigate the single ballot method of elections and if they, in consultation with the Bishop, deem it wise to take such steps as may be necessary to put this method into effect at the next annual Diocesan Convention.

The motion carried and was referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. James D. Beckwith offered the following resolution:

Resolved, that this Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina ask the Bishop to appoint a Commission on Faith and Order.

The purpose of this Commission shall be as follows:

1. To study the various movements toward church unity laying special emphasis upon the activity of our General Convention in reference to the Presbyterians.

2. To suggest ways and means of bringing about a fuller sense of cooperation with the other denominations, ever striving toward ultimate union.

3. To make a report of the activities of the Commission at the next annual convention.

A resolution, looking toward a schedule for conventions, offered by the Rev. John A. Wright, was lost.

Mr. Hal A. London in behalf of the Rector and Vestry of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte extended an invitation to the 124th Annual Convention. The invitation was accepted with thanks.

The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes offered the following resolution which was adopted by a standing vote:

Resolved, That this Convention, the one hundred twenty-third of the Diocese of North Carolina, desires to express to the Rector, the Vestry and the Congregation of The Church of the Good Shepherd, its sincere gratitude for the whole-hearted hospitality of their entertainment, and the gracious courtesy with which they provided every facility for the proper carrying out of the work of this Convention.

Also, it would give expression to its genuine appreciation to St. Mary's for its delightful luncheon, to St. Augustine for its cordial cooperation, and to all others of the City of Raleigh who contributed to make this occasion one of happy and lasting memory.

The report of the Good Samaritan Hospital was read by Mr. J. W. Fox. (Page 159).

The Rev. David T. Eaton offered the following resolution:

RESOLVED: That the Convention express its appreciation to our Bishop for the splendid sermon delivered by him last evening, that the Secretary be requested to take the necessary steps to secure its publication in whole or in part in the Southern Churchman, and that the idea of an annual convention sermon be commended, with the hope that it will be continued at succeeding conventions as a regular custom.

The minutes of the second day were then read and approved.

After the singing of the *Gloria in Excelsis* and the Benediction by the Bishop the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

APPENDIX A

ADDRESS AND JOURNAL OF THE BISHOP

Address of the Bishop

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

I welcome you as we assemble for the one hundred and twenty-third annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina. This Parish where we are meeting has within recent years grown to be one of the largest and most influential Churches of the Diocese with a communicant strength of nearly one thousand persons and including in its membership the Chancellor, the Treasurer and one of two Lay Trustees. In the House of Deputies at the General Convention of 1934 three members of the North Carolina delegation were communicants of this Parish. It is unusual that any Church should enjoy the advantage of an unbroken series of able Rectors or should supply the Diocese with a high type of lay leadership over a long period of years. It is a pleasure to acknowledge the substantial contribution that the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, has made and continues to make to our Diocesan life.

The last time we met in this Church was May 16, 1922. The seventeen years that have elapsed since then have been fraught with so many changes that one is tempted to say that this interval has witnessed the end of an old era and the beginning of a new one. We are deeply conscious of the losses that have attended these changes. Of the Clergy who came to the Convention in 1922 one-fourth are still at work in this Diocese, one-fourth, including two Bishops, have been called to higher realms of service in the Church Triumphant, seven percent are retired from active duty and forty-three percent have transferred to other Dioceses. Three out of four faces that were familiar here seventeen years ago are now removed. An even more sweeping change in the personnel of the laity has taken place. We recall the past not with sentiment but with gratitude when we name such personages as Richard H. Lewis, William A. Erwin, Lawrence S. Holt, Thomas H.

Battle, Samuel S. Nash, William H. Ruffin, Thomas H. Webb, to mention only a few of that noble army of laymen who are now "numbered with the saints in glory everlasting," to whom memory, in passing, lifts its hat. These spacious men who loved and served their Church with all their hearts have gone out from among us and have left behind a legacy of loyalty that younger standard bearers have eagerly picked up and carried on. Unquestionably a new day has come in the Church with new faces, new leaders, new policies and plans of administration and hosts of unprecedented conditions and problems. And with this newness has come a freshness and youthfulness of outlook in the rising generation of laymen who believe in the God of their fathers and in the contemporaneousness of the living and all sufficient Christ.

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NECROLOGY

In my Convention address at Tarboro last year, I referred to the death of the Rev. Milton Augustus Barber, S. T. D. in Charlotte on March 10, 1938. It is impossible for us to meet, as we are doing this year, in the city where he labored with devotion and great effectiveness without recalling once more the position of leadership and influence which he exerted in this Diocese for a quarter of a century. In these days of indecisiveness, it is stimulating to remember the indomitable courage with which Dr. Barber maintained and defended his unwavering convictions.

* * * * *

On December 28, 1938, the Rev. Mark Hemingway Milne, rector of St. Luke's Parish, and Priest in Charge of St. Peter's Mission, Salisbury, was called to rest. The summons came suddenly while he was visiting sick parishioners at a local hospital. The end of his life was like the rest of it, an offering of pastoral devotion. Mr. Milne was a native of New York State. He was educated at Hobart College and the General Theological Seminary. After serving Churches in New York, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin,

he came to this Diocese October 10, 1918. The first epidemic of influenza was then at its height. Mr. Milne soon established himself in the confidence and affection of his people by his genuine personal interest in them. His official positions in this Diocese were of an inconspicuous sort. For years he served as a Trustee of the Murdoch Memorial Society and as an Examining Chaplain. Of a quiet and retiring nature, almost bordering on timidity, Mr. Milne shrank from positions of public responsibility. His best ministry was that of the good shepherd who leads and feeds his flock in solitary places and cares for them one by one. It was sufficient for him that his secret charities were known only by Him who sees in secret. He lives on imperishably in the heart and character of the people for whom he poured out his life. Even if there were no immortality, such a life goes on from generation to generation.

* * * * *

The Rev. William John Wright, retired Priest of the Diocese, died on January 18, 1939, at his home in Bethesda, Maryland. Mr. Wright came to North Carolina August 1, 1919, and served as Priest in Charge of Trinity Church, Statesville, and St. James' Mission, Iredell County until 1923, when he moved to Mount Airy to assume charge of Trinity Church in that city, Christ Church, Walnut Cove and St. Philip's, Germanton. He remained in this field until 1926 when he returned to Maryland retaining his canonical residence in this diocese. Mr. Wright was a man of real scholarly attainments. He was sent abroad at the age of nine to be educated. He was graduated from the Gymnasium of Baden-Baden, Germany, and the Lycee of Tours, France. He received his theological training at the General Seminary in New York. He was slight of physical stature but of unbounded energy. It was no uncommon thing for him to walk the sixteen miles from Statesville to St. James' Mission, Iredell County, where he would then officiate and preach. A man of exquisite refinement and old-world culture, he was beloved by his congregation, and by a small circle of friends who saw beneath a shy student's nature the purity and beauty of his character.

In years past, I have never undertaken to speak of the losses sustained by the Church in the death, from time to time, of distinguished representatives of the Episcopate. I cannot refrain from mentioning, however, the genuine feeling of sadness that came over this Diocese when our near neighbor, the Bishop of Upper South Carolina, died suddenly at Kanuga on August the 28th. Probably the most unpretentious of men, humble like a child, homely and yet beautiful in the simplicity of his ways and words, Bishop Finlay won the hearts of young and old alike by his transparent sincerity. Kanuga is his monument, but more enduring even is the memory of this unaffected servant of Christ whose genius it was to love his friends.

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SUMMARY OF OFFICIAL ACTS

The Journal of my Official Acts is already familiar to readers of "The North Carolina Churchman" where it has appeared, with slight modifications, under the title, "Leaves from the Bishop's Note Book". I submit this formal Diary for publication in the Diocesan Journal, and name here a few compressed but vital statistics. Within this Diocese, I made during the year 1938 exactly 100 Visitations, celebrated the Holy Communion 27 times, officiated at 4 Baptisms, 5 Weddings, 7 Funerals and 40 other services. I licensed 30 Lay Readers, attended 56 committee, board or department meetings, held 177 conferences with individuals or groups, preached 86 times and delivered 82 addresses and lectures. I ordained three Candidates for Holy Orders to the Diaconate and advanced one Deacon to the Priesthood. I confirmed 713 persons, of which number 68 were Negroes.

Outside the Diocese, I attended a Conference of the Southern Bishops in Atlanta on February 3rd; ordained to the Diaconate Louis Aldworth Haskell, Candidate for Holy Orders from this Diocese, in St. Paul's Church, Augusta, Ga., on June 19th; attended a meeting of the Board of Managers of Kanuga Lake Corporation, July 20th and two meetings of the Trustees of the Bishop Payne Divinity

School in Petersburg, Va.; participated in the consecration of the Rev. Henry Disbrow Phillips, D.D. as Bishop of Southwestern Virginia, at St. Paul's Church, Lynchburg, September 27th and in the Centennial Observance of Ascension Parish, Frankfort, Ky., October 30th where I was born during my father's rectorship. Altogether my extra-Diocesan acts were as follows: One celebration of the Holy Communion, one ordination, 5 committee meetings, 2 conferences, 5 addresses and 9 sermons.

The number of confirmations last year, 713, is worthy of special mention. This is the largest number since 1925 when 717 persons were confirmed by Bishop Cheshire, Bishop Delany and myself. Two consecutive years, 1937 and 1938, have established records in the number of Confirmations so far as my Episcopate extends. I trust that this increase is not a mere coincidence. I prefer to believe that it is due to a deep undertone of seriousness in the lives of people generally and also to a greater degree of effectiveness on the part of our clergy in presenting the claims of the Church. The Parish, Mission and Negro congregation in which there were the highest number of confirmations were respectively, Christ Church, Raleigh, St. Luke's, Spray and Resurrection, Henderson.

It is a pleasure to call the attention of this Convention to the extensive repairs and improvements to Church property that have been completed within the year, and the new building programs that have been projected. On January 24, I dedicated the new maternity pavilion at the Good Samaritan Hospital, Charlotte, and on May 22, blessed the new Sunday School Annex to St. Bartholomew's Church, Pittsboro. On January 30, I laid the corner stone of the new Parish House of St. Luke's, Salisbury, and on May 1, I consecrated Holy Trinity Church, Monroe. I have also dedicated a number of memorials that have enriched the furnishings of several Churches and endeared them to their congregations, notably at Christ Church, Cleveland, St. Alban's, Littleton, Christ Church, Raleigh, and St. Paul's, Winston-Salem. St. David's, Laurinburg, and St. Mary's, Orange County, and Holy Cross, States-

ville, have been thoroughly renovated and beautified. Late in the year, building was begun for a new Church on the site of an old log Chapel at Knollhurst, in the country near Madison. Much of the labor as well as material was contributed by local members and friends of the Church under the capable leadership of Mr. Charles R. Wall. This Church has adopted the name of St. Martins-in-the-Woods. On November 20, ground was broken for the erection of a new Chapel on the edge of the town of Leaksville. This venture represents the initiative and evangelical zeal of our missionary in Rockingham County, Miss Lillie H. Hill, who deeded to the Diocese the lot on which the building stands. This modest House of Prayer, known as St. Mary's, is now finished and stands on the side of the road as an eloquent witness to the saving grace of God. Since the first of January, 35 persons have been baptized in this little Chapel, most of them adults. The new Church at Asheboro is now practically finished and furnished, and plans are maturing for the erection of Christ Church, Albemarle. The youngest parish in the Diocese, St. Andrew's, Charlotte, built a new rectory last fall. To all of these zealous congregations and to others whose mention the limit of space forbids, we extend our hearty felicitations, and thank them for the encouragement of these outward evidences they have supplied of faith in Christ and devotion to His Church.

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CLERICAL CHANGES

During the year, we gained three clergymen by ordination to the Diaconate:

June 3, in the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, Robert Martin Man, Candidate for Holy Orders.

June 13, in Christ Church, Raleigh, Charles Upchurch Harris, Jr., Candidate for Holy Orders.

June 19, in St. Paul's Church, Augusta, Ga., Louis Aldworth Haskell, Candidate for Holy Orders.

July 15, in Trinity Church, Statesville, I ordained to the Priesthood, the Rev. Robert Macbeth Bird, Deacon.

We have added by transfer from other Dioceses the following clergymen :

May 15, from the Diocese of Southern Virginia, the Rev. James Dunbar Beckwith, Priest.

May 28, from the Diocese of South Carolina, the Rev. Clarence Alfred Cole, Priest.

June 22, from the Diocese of West Virginia, the Rev. Leicester Foulk Kent, his Letter Dimissory from Bishop Gravatt being dated September 1, 1937.

July 6, from the Diocese of Rhode Island, the Rev. Gray Temple, Deacon.

We welcome these new men into our Diocesan family with cordiality and affection. They are all splendidly equipped and during their brief residence in North Carolina have already demonstrated their earnestness and ability.

Our losses have been by the death of three beloved brethren already referred to and by one removal and by one retirement.

April 30th, the Rev. Albert Evans Sanderson, Priest, removed to the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia to accept the rectorship of a parish in Bristol.

August 1st, the Rev. Edwin William Hurst, Priest, retired from the active ministry after a prolonged illness under the disability provisions of the Church Pension Fund. Mr. Hurst will continue his canonical residence in the diocese with the status of a retired Priest.

To include in this record of Clerical Changes the first four months of 1939, it becomes necessary to mention also the removal to the Diocese of Kentucky of the Rev. George A. Fisher, Jr., on March 31st.

As of this date, May 9, 1939, the clergy of the Diocese are classified as follows : Active, 49 Priests and 4 Deacons ; Retired 5 Priests ; Non-parochial 4 Priests ; Total 62. There are 3 Candidates for Holy Orders and 5 Postulants.

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FIELDS OF LABOR

During the year there were a number of changes in the Fields in which our clergy are laboring.

January 1, the Rev. Frank D. Dean became Priest in Charge of Trinity Church, Mount Airy and Galloway Memorial, Elkin.

January 27, the Rev. Ralph A. Bridges, rector of St. Stephen's Parish, Erwin, gave up the charge of St. Paul's Church, Smithfield and St. Gabriel's Mission, Selma.

February 1, the Rev. John F. Hamaker became Priest in Charge of these two Missions in Smithfield and Selma.

February 1, the Rev. John Q. Beckwith, Jr., became rector of St. Timothy's Parish, Wilson, succeeding the Rev. Dr. Dean.

April 16, the Rev. Edwin W. Hurst discontinued his services as Priest in Charge of the Church of the Messiah, Rockingham, and All Saints, Hamlet.

May 15, the Rev. James D. Beckwith became rector of St. Matthew's Parish, Hillsboro and Priest in Charge of St. Mary's Mission, Orange County, succeeding his brother, the Rev. John Q. Beckwith, Jr.

May 28, the Rev. Clarence Alfred Cole became rector of St. Stephen's Parish, Oxford, and Priest in Charge of St. Peter's, Stovall, and Trinity Church, Townesville, succeeding the Rev. Albert E. Sanderson.

June 3, the Rev. Robert M. Man became Deacon in Charge of the Church of the Messiah, Rockingham, All Saints', Hamlet, and St. David's, Laurinburg, succeeding the Rev. Edwin A. Hurst.

June 13, the Rev. Charles U. Harris, Jr., became Deacon in Charge of All Saints Parish, Roanoke Rapids, and St. Luke's, Northampton County, replacing the Rev. Joseph N. Bynum who since February 24, 1938 has been inactive because of ill health.

June 19, the Rev. Louis A. Haskell became assistant to the Rector of Christ Church and Deacon in Charge of St. Saviour's Mission, Raleigh.

June 29, the Rev. Gray Temple began his ministry in this Diocese as assistant to the rector of Calvary Parish, Tarboro, and Deacon in Charge of certain Edgecombe County Missions.

July 15, the Rev. Robert M. Bird became Priest in

Charge of Trinity Church, Statesville and St. James' Mission, Iredell County, the same field that he had served as Deacon.

October 23, the Rev. A. Stratton Lawrence, Jr., relinquished the charge of St. Mark's Mission, Roxboro, and was succeeded by the Rev. C. Alfred Cole of Oxford.

The year closed with vacancies in one Negro field comprising the Missions at Warrenton, Littleton and Warren County, and also at St. Luke's Parish and St. Peter's Mission, Salisbury, by reason of Mr. Milne's death late in December. It is gratifying to report that this latter vacancy was filled on March 1, 1939 by the Rev. Edward Brailsford Guerry who came to us from the Diocese of Virginia.

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I must not detain you longer with this record of the past, especially since I am to have the privilege of addressing you again tonight. I close this report with a personal reference at the risk of transgressing the canons of good taste. It is impossible for me to escape the overwhelming consciousness that the last time the Convention met in this parish, an episcopal election was held. I have never recovered from the stunning effect of that election. It has been and will remain the strangest and most mysterious experience of my life. It has been easier ever since to believe in the reality and nearness of the unseen world. For all the kindness bestowed on me by the clergy and people of this beloved Diocese, for all the blessings of these seventeen eventful years, too many to enumerate and too sacred to mention except with awe and wonderment, I give thanks to God who has been gracious unto his servant.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE

The Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina had four meetings during the year 1938.

On January 11, 1938 the Committee met at The Wilrick Hotel, Sanford, N. C., and took the following action.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of Reverend Raymond Adams Heron as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Massachusetts.

Consent was given to the ordination to the Priesthood of Reverend Robert Macbeth Bird.

The Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina presented to the Committee the Schedule of Appropriations from the Lawrence S. Holt Fund for the year 1938, and the same was approved, and the Bishop was authorized to use any balance of the Income in his discretion.

On May 11, 1938, the Committee met in the Parish House, Calvary Church, Tarboro, N. C., and took the following action.

The mortgage indebtedness against the property of Saint Mary's Church, High Point, N. C., was called to the attention of the Standing Committee, and the said Committee gave its consent and approval to the deed of trust or mortgage and debts secured thereby, made by Saint Mary's Church, High Point, N. C.

Consent was given to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Ohio.

Mr. Charles U. Harris, Jr., a candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate at any time after his graduation from the Virginia Theological Seminary.

Mr. Louis A. Haskell, a candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate at any time after his graduation from the Virginia Theological Seminary.

Mr. Robert Martin Man, a candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate at any time after his graduation from the Virginia Theological Seminary.

The President of the Standing Committee was directed to ask the Diocesan convention to appoint a Committee to draw suitable resolutions to the memory of the lately deceased President of this Committee, the Reverend Milton A. Barber, S.T.D.

Rev. Isaac W. Hughes was elected President of the Standing Committee to succeed Dr. Barber, deceased.

On September 16, 1938 the Committee met again in Christ Church Parish House, Raleigh, N. C., and took the following action.

The Committee having been notified of the admission by the Bishop of Mr. Edwin Bedford Jeffress, Jr. as a Postulant, of Holy Trinity Parish, Greensboro, N. C., the Committee recognized Mr. Jeffress as a Postulant from May 18, 1938.

Mr. Rufus Josephus Womble, a Postulant, having been recommended by the Bishop, was admitted as a Candidate for Holy Orders as of September 3, 1938.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Henry Disbrow Phillips, D.D., as Bishop of the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Karl Morgan Block, D.D., L.L.D., as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of California.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Edmund Pendleton Dandridge, D.D., as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Tennessee.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Richard Bland Mitchell, D.D., as Bishop of the Diocese of Arkansas.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Malcolm Endicott Peabody, A.B., D.D., as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Central New York.

Consent was given to the election of a Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Rhode Island.

The Secretary, upon resolution, conveyed the sympathy of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina to Reverend H. D. Phillips, President of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina on account of the death of the Right Reverend Kirkman G. Finlay.

It was resolved that the Diocesan Executive Council be requested to put an item of \$50.00 in the Budget of the Diocese to cover the expenses of the Standing Committee.

On December 5, 1938, the Committee met at Ravenscroft, Raleigh, N. C., and took the following action.

Consent of the Committee was given to the consecration and ordination of—

(1) The Very Reverend Alexander Hugo Blankenship as Bishop of the Missionary District of Cuba;

and (2) The Reverend Spence Burton as Suffragan Missionary Bishop of the District of Haiti and the Dominican Republic.

The Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina presented to the Committee his proposed Schedule of Appropriations of income for the year 1939 from the Lawrence S. Holt Fund, and the same was approved, and the Bishop was authorized to use, in his discretion, any undesignated balance from said income, provided it is expended within the terms of the said trust.

The Committee asked that the Committee on Evaluation of the Missionary Work in the Diocese be requested to make a special study of the possibility of the Missionary field in Edgecombe County, and whether or not such a large appropriation for this work from the Holt Fund is justified.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

The Trustees of the Diocese respectfully report to the Convention:

1. That the actions taken by the Trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina since their last report are set forth in Exhibit A hereto attached.

2. The account of the Trustees of the Diocese is shown in Exhibit B hereto attached. The total value of the trust has increased to \$55,058.63, accounted for by payment of \$3,000.00 upon pledge heretofore made by Alexander B. Andrews, Esquire, and receipt of a Two Thousand Dollar legacy from the Estate of the Reverend J. E. Ingle, and an increase of the market value of the securities at the accounting date. While the market value of the securities have increased, the dividends payable have not kept pace with the increase in value and the net earnings, after all expenses were deducted, amounted to 4.462%. Total receipts for the year for income, however, increased from \$2,460.84 to \$2,676.60.

3. The Trustees took over, in September 1938, in accordance with the terms of the trust, the assets of the Francis J. Murdoch Society for the increase of the Ministry, the account of which is attached hereto and Marked Exhibit C.

4. The Trustees, in carrying out the instructions received at the Convention in 1937, have scheduled all the property of the Diocese and insured the same in one blanket policy. A report of the status of that insurance is contained in the heading "Mission Insurance" on page 5 of the account of the Trustees. It will be noted that on December 31st, the Trustees borrowed from the Security National Bank of Greensboro, Raleigh Branch, the sum of \$2,280.00 for a period of seven months for the purpose of paying the premiums on such insurance. The Trustees pledged against this loan the short rate cancellation value of the insurance policies. The Trustees expected this loan to be taken up from payments made by missions on the properties actually used by them. However, although notices have been sent monthly to such missions, a large amount of the premiums on insurance on missions remains in arrears and has not been paid. The total cost of the insurance for insuring all the property held in the name of the Trustees of the Diocese amounted to \$3,072.40. There has been paid on account of the same by various missions the sum of \$1,110.00 and the amount due the Security National Bank to make up the difference is, at the present time, \$1,970.00. The amount of premiums due by various missions and now unpaid are set out in Exhibit D attached hereto.

The insurance, as written, covers the property of the Diocese for a period of four years, one-fourth expiring one year from October 5th, 1938, one-fourth two years, one-fourth three years and one-fourth four years from said date. For this reason the first

premium was much larger than it will hereafter be. For all succeeding years the premium covering all Diocesan property will amount to about one-third of the amount of the premium for the first year, since in each year hereafter the premium will pay for one-fourth of the insurance on the property for a four-year term. The insurance is carried in the following companies:

- The Michigan Fire and Marine Insurance Company
- The Atlantic Fire Insurance Company
- The North Carolina Home Insurance Company
- The Fidelity and Guaranty Fire Corporation

The Trustees have arranged for the commissions for writing the insurance to be distributed to local agents as designated by the individual missions. Prior to writing the insurance the companies concerned inspected and photographed the properties insured. That information was turned over to the Trustees of the Diocese and is open for inspection by the Convention.

6. The Ladies Aid Society Fund, Kittrell—This Fund was established by the Ladies Aid Society at Kittrell, North Carolina, in 1903 and has, since August 1st, 1904, been administered by J. C. Kittrell of Henderson. Over a period of years the Trustees have corresponded with Mr. Kittrell and Miss Kate Capehart of Washington, North Carolina, with reference to the assets in the said Fund. The Trustees are informed that there has been a loss in interest on the Fund due to the failure of the payment of interest on the note of J. E. Hunt. This interest, the Trustees are informed, which has not been paid by said Hunt amounts to \$2,310.00. The interest in the sum of \$2,310.00, however, has been paid to the Treasurer of the Diocese over a period of ten years without notification that the interest was not actually collected. Preparatory to turning over the assets of the trust to the Trustees, Mr. Kittrell has suggested that he should retain from the assets said \$2,310.00 with interest from the dates of the several payments. Your Trustees, being of the opinion that they had no authority to accept settlement of Mr. Kittrell as outlined, declined to make such settlement and report the fact that a controversy with reference to the assets of the Ladies Aid Society of Kittrell has arisen. Your Trustees recommend that a committee of the Convention be appointed to hear the facts with reference to the said fund, giving Mr. Kittrell and Miss Capehart an opportunity to be heard, and that the Trustees be authorized to act upon the direction given by that committee after such investigation.

7. The Trustees report that there is no adequate independent audit made of their accounts. The Trustees, however, believe that an annual check of the securities in hand should be made and they do therefore recommend that the Convention designate an auditor to make such check and to summarize the accounts of the Trustees, the check and summary to be made immediately after the annual

accounting date of the Custodian of the Trustees, to-wit, January 15th of each year.

8. The Trustees attach hereto a list of properties which they believe should be sold by the Diocese. The estimated sale price, in cases of tenant properties, will not, when invested, produce incomes received from rentals. In the case of certain mission Churches a very small amount, compared to the costs of the property, can probably be received. However, the Trustees have insufficient funds to keep the properties in repair and they suggest that the standing of the Church is probably damaged in a community by the ownership of rental property in a poor condition and by the ownership of Church buildings which are in a dilapidated condition. The list of properties referred to and hereto attached is marked Exhibit F.

During the past year, your Chancellor has conferred upon several matters with the Bishop, which were largely matters of business judgment and not rulings upon the Canons.

Under date of August 3rd, this office advised that where a hospital held property under a charter from the State of North Carolina, that it could convey under the state law, as provided for corporations. On the other hand, if it was an unincorporated body, or held by Trustees under the general law, for the benefit of the Church, then it would come under the provisions of the Canons of the General Convention (Canon 48, Sec. 22) and of the Diocese of North Carolina (Canon XXIV, Sec. 2) which requires "it shall first obtain the written consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese."

Under date of November 21, 1938, a copy of which is hereto attached, this writer advised the Bishop that under Article IX, Sec. 3 of the Constitution of the Diocese (1935 edition, page 6) that the right to vote in "all Parochial Elections" is restricted to "males of the age of twenty-one years, members of the Parish, who shall have subscribed a declaration" as therein set out. Provided, where it was the "existing customs of any already organized Parish" (prior to 1859) the right to vote shall not be infringed upon, and provided, further, "that any Parish may be vote of a majority of

the voters, as at present qualified, permit all members of the Parish of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have subscribed to the above declaration, to vote in parochial elections”.

Under this language, it looks like, and I am obliged to so advise you, that the right to vote in parochial elections is (a) restricted only to males twenty-one years of age and over, except (b) where the custom is for all to vote (including women), and existed prior to 1859, or (c) where the qualified voters (male) vote that all twenty-one years of age and over may participate in the election.

A copy of this letter was furnished to the Committee on Canons for their information.

In the case of a Trust Company, the executor and trustee under a will leaving money in trust, the interest primarily to be paid to the upkeep of a Mission, which the trustee requested the Diocese to waive its right to receive the check in favor of the Treasurer of the Mission, this was declined.

This request was declined as the title to Mission property is in the Trustees of the Diocese, of which the Bishop is the responsible head, and payments to him are turned over to the Treasurer of the Diocese, a bonded officer. The basic organization of the Church is Diocesan and not Parochial. Therefore, the “duly organized governing body” to whom the payment is to be made, would be the Trustees of the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The diocesan Executive Council has held three meetings since the last Convention—Sept. 20, 1938, Jan. 10, and April 27, 1939.

At the first of these the Bishop appointed the membership of the five departments of the Council as follows:

FINANCE: Mr. Stephen E. Burroughs, Chairman; Mr. Kemp D. Battle, Mr. J. Porter Stedman, Mr. Arthur H. London.

FIELD AND PUBLICITY: The Rev. M. Geo. Henry, Chairman; Mr. Hobart T. Steele, The Rev. Frank E. Pulley, Mrs. William J. Gordon.

EDUCATION: The Rev. Jas. M. Dick, Chairman; Mr. John S. Holmes, Miss Cuma Lee Odell, Mr. George C. Pollard, Mrs. Johnston King.

SOCIAL SERVICE: The Rev. John L. Jackson, Chairman; Mrs. Ben White.

MISSIONS: The Rev. Wm. S. Turner, Chairman; The Rev. B. N. deFoe Wagner, Mrs. William J. Gordon, Mrs. Ben White, Mr. George C. Pollard.

The assessments of parishes and missions for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund were based on 9½% of current expenses. The quotas for the Church's Program Fund for 1939 were found by obtaining

an average of the following factors: 1) \$4 per communicant for parishes, \$2 for organized missions, and \$1 for unorganized missions; 2) the average amount given annually over the last three years to the Church's Program; 3) 50% of current operating expenses for 1937.

Instead of having a Diocesan Tour with a team of outside speakers, in preparation for the Every Member Canvass, the Council approved the plan presented by the Rev. M. George Henry, whereby a group of selected laymen met in Burlington for instruction on the budget from a national, diocesan and parochial standpoint, and then visited the various parishes and missions to confer with vestries and Every Member Canvass committees in connection with their own canvasses. This plan produced a substantial increase in the amount pledged.

The Rev. Jas. McDowell Dick and Mr. John S. Holmes were elected as additional members of the committee to represent this Diocese on the Kanuga Board of Managers, the other members of this committee being Mrs. William J. Gordon and William J. Gordon, Jr.

A new Vade Mecum Camp committee of five members, which will report to the Executive Council, was appointed at the September meeting. This committee was instructed to find a business manager for the Camps, preferably a priest who would have charge also of missions in the vicinity. The Rev. A. Stratton Lawrence, Jr., had tendered his resignation as Business Manager making this step necessary. Later the Rev. Mr. Lawrence accepted the Bishop's assignment to the Churches at Walnut Cove, Germanton, and Vade Mecum, with charge of the Vade Mecum Camps as Business Manager, in residence at Walnut Cove.

The Rev. David W. Yates presented the report of the Committee on Strategy and Evaluation of Diocesan Missions, which the Council received with appreciation, referring the recommendations to the trustees of the Diocese and the several departments of Executive Council affected by the report.

At the January meeting, the Church's Program Budget was revised in the light of anticipated income for 1939, being \$45,134.60 in pledges secured by the Every Member Canvass, and \$13,467.50 from other sources, principally endowments, making a current operating budget of \$58,601.50 for 1939.

Messrs. Kemp D. Battle and Henry M. London were appointed as a special committee to draw up a memorial resolution regarding the death of Mr. J. Renwick Wilkes, treasurer of the Church's Program Fund for 20 years, who died in Charlotte, April 19. Their report is attached to these notes.

The Bishop, with the consent of the Council and the Bank concerned, appointed the Rev. John Long Jackson as temporary treasurer of this Fund, until a successor is elected and takes office.

The Council adopted a tentative budget for 1940, subject to ap-

proval of the Convention, of \$50,061.00 net, for the Church's Program, and \$11,407.00 for the Episcopal Maintenance Budget, or a total of \$61,468.00.

MEMORIAL MINUTES

The Council has learned with unaffected grief of the death on April 19, 1939, at Charlotte, N. C., of the treasurer of the Church's Program for this Diocese. James Renwick Wilkes was born in July, 1871 the child of devoted members of St. Peter's Church, of which his father was long Senior Warden. His mother was the moving spirit in the organization of the Good Samaritan Hospital and a mainstay in the support of St. Peter's Hospital and of every important movement in the life of the Church in that community. Mr. Wilkes became treasurer of the Forward Movement Fund in 1920 and was treasurer of that fund and its successor, the Church's Program Fund, until his recent death.

His painstaking care and complete loyalty in the performance of his duties have been of incalculable value to the Church's life in this diocese and an unending inspiration to all of us who have been associated with him.

A member of St. Martin's Church, Charlotte, sometime Senior Warden and treasurer and its representative in Diocesan Conventions, he has continued throughout his life the tradition of church work and loyalty which for nearly a century have been associated with the name of his family in Mecklenburg County.

With the memory of his faithful work, and inspired by his unassuming but forceful example, we take courage from his life and resolve to press forward in the work so dear to his heart.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

Your committee on the State of the Church respectfully submits the following report:

The statistics of the Diocese gathered from the Parochial reports are in some ways encouraging, and in others not so encouraging. The Church School is still a problem that seems still to be without an adequate answer. Steadily for the past several years, our church schools are decreasing in numbers of pupils. In 1931 there were 7,023. Last year we report 6,032. For this year there is still a decrease over last year of a hundred and thirty-nine, leaving the present number of pupils in our Sunday Schools all over the diocese at only 5,893. In other words in the past seven years there has been a decrease of over a thousand.

Adult Bible Classes have held their enrollment almost constant. The decreasing number of children in our Church Schools is a problem that we should all face. At the present rate it will not be long before there will be no church school for training our young people. One explanation may be offered that there is this same decline in the public school systems, *but* our decline has been greater in proportion. We still have in the face of this decline in our schools a great number of unchurched children who receive no religious instruction, so we can not blame entirely the scarcity of children on our shrinking school.

There is noted an increase in the number of children baptized and a large increase over last year of the number of adults baptized. Of the 497 persons baptized, 112 were adults. The total number of baptized persons in the church has steadily grown and today stands at 17,744. This marks an increase in the past seven years of over 1,800.

A similar increase is noted in the total number of confirmed persons. During the year of 1938 there were (713) persons confirmed, the largest number that has been reported for the past thirteen years. The number of communicants reported is the largest in the history of the diocese, there being 12,986 or an increase over 1937 of 392.

Another encouraging condition is to be noted. The parishes and missions of the diocese are steadily increasing their giving to the support of the Church's work outside their own parish. On the basis of the returns from the campaign in the fall of 1938 the Diocese

was able to make a definite stride in making its own work more effective, and was also able to raise its giving to the National Council by a considerable sum over 1937. We note with pleasure the division of work in certain fields of the Diocese. The Walnut Cove-Mayodan field has been divided, placing a resident minister in both places. The Calvary Parish field has been greatly helped by the addition of an assistant Rector to assist in the work in the five missions connected with that parish. We are delighted to hear of the creation of a new field in Asheboro with a resident minister beginning his work there this June. We hope that soon there may be the creation of two further fields with resident ministers, one in Sanford to cover Lee County, and one in Roxboro to cover Person and Yancey counties. Again the committee must with regret remind the convention that there is a great need for a Negro clergyman in the Warren County Field. For almost two years this field has been without a minister.

There are two further matters that we think reflect very definitely the state of the church, and those two matters are not at all reflections of glory. The first of those matters is that such a small number of the communicants of the Church support the church by regularly giving to its program. According to the blanks reporting the requested information at the time of the every member canvass, only 48% of the communicants pledged to the support of the church.

The second matter is the difficulty of any department of the executive council to receive replies to letters to the clergy. If any agent of a business concern was as slow in sending in reports, or in answering letters from the executive branch of the business as are our clergy, they would be fired with no hesitation. This fact is not drawn from all of the clergy, but from those who are perennial offenders, not to one department, but to all.

We note with pleasure that there has been secured for Chapel Hill a man to do college work. This is an advance, but we must bear in mind that there are still several large student centers without men to do this particular work—Raleigh, Duke University.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

Bishop Penick, Gentlemen of the Clergy, and other Convention Delegates:

I should like to make the report of the Woman's Auxiliary for the year 1938 against a background of the general Auxiliary work in this diocese. 1938 may be called a typical year, both in its usual routine and in its extra activities and gifts. The financial statement

shows a total of \$23,292.00. \$4,363.42 of this was reported by the Department of Christian Social Service, the major portion of which was spent for special supplies at the Thompson Orphanage, and locally, by the various branches. Included in the total also was \$2,069.91 spent by the Supply Department chiefly for the clothing of children at the Orphanage and two personal boxes to missionaries outside of the Diocese. The United Thank Offering amounted to \$6,678.09. At the triennial meeting in Cincinnati this diocesan Auxiliary gave $\frac{1}{4}$ of the United Thank Offering of the Province of Sewanee and ranked seventeenth among the dioceses in the total offering. Today when three of the six ingatherings of this triennium have been taken, the total is somewhat in excess of half of the offering of the last triennium.

Through the Auxiliary Diocesan Treasurer's hands there has passed an amount equalling \$10,180.58. The Auxiliary adopted a budget of \$6,600 to be divided equally between diocesan items and those outside the diocese. The pledges within the diocese included one-half of the salary of the Diocesan Director of Religious Education and a generous portion of the salary of the minister at Ephphatha Church, Durham; a gift of \$900 for Bishop Penick's discretionary fund and the expenses of administration. The pledges outside the diocese provided the salary of a nurse at Anvik, Alaska; the support of 10 girls at the House of Bethany, Cape Mount, Liberia; \$1,500 for St. Mary's School for Indian Girls in South Dakota; a scholarship for a young woman from Cuba in training at the Tuttle School to go back to work among her own people. In addition to the pledges, the Auxiliary has given specials of a birthday gift of \$100 to Miss Ellen Hicks of Oxford, now in Porto Rico, upon her retirement after thirty-three years as a missionary nurse, gifts equally as generous to Annie Cheshire Tucker and Mary Wood McKenzie and smaller gifts to others of our missionaries. We have contributed the special offering of the Feast of the Purification to work among the blind; we have built a root cellar to help Bessie Blacknall preserve her vegetables in Alaska, and largest item of all, we have provided funds which enabled Archdeacon Simmonds to harness a spring in Cape Mount, Liberia, and put water in the buildings of the mission there. Not only does the water system contribute to the health and comfort of our workers, but the chiefs of the neighboring villages have come to see the marvel of "the water that walks up hill" and one has already begun to install a ram pump in his community. We trust the benefits may be far-reaching.

One reason for giving these details is that much time is given in the Convention proceedings to a discussion of dollars and cents and it seems well to remember while dealing with a diocesan budget, the generous additional gifts which the women make. A more important reason is because not all the women in the diocese share in this work, and I do believe that a closer cooperation of the clergy, based upon

an intimate knowledge of Auxiliary work, can help in reaching the "un-Auxiliary-minded."

However, not all the sacrifice or the activity is financial or even tangible. An intensive study of India and an ever-present sympathetic interest in China have given a vision both of the need and the challenging opportunity in these fields and the world-wide opportunity for the advance in missionary effort. We have given heed to the decreasing number of so-called foreign missionaries from this diocese; at present, there are only six under appointment, the Rev. Francis Cox in China, the Rev. William F. Draper in Japan, the Rev. J. L. Martin in Hawaii, Miss Mary Wood McKenzie, senior missionary in Liberia, Miss Bessie Blacknall in Alaska and Miss Laura Clark in China. Added to these are three missionary wives, Mrs. Ethel L. Byerly Simmonds, Mrs. Annie Cheshire Tucker and Mrs. Susan Smith Chapman. We ask you to add your most earnest prayers that God may call out young men and women from our midst, our own sons and daughters to go "into all nations and make disciples".

For the second time, the annual meeting held in January instead of the Spring, proved successful, with one of the largest attendances on record. We are not unmindful that the central location of Chapel Hill and its many attractions contributed to this, and the presence of the Presiding Bishop added dignity and importance to the meeting. Also, again the 5-day Auxiliary Conference at Vade Mecum proved very valuable and those close to this activity feel that it is permanently established as a part of our diocesan life.

Special emphasis has been laid upon the devotional life of the Auxiliary as the guiding and empowering Spirit of all its other activity. During Lent, Quiet Days were held in each of the eight Districts and other inspirational meetings were held from time to time.

The year was marked by a very happy and increasing spirit of fellowship with the Young People's Service League, and of cooperation with the Laymen's League with such results that we trust we may, as a diocese, go "Forward and Together", under God.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S SERVICE LEAGUE

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

I feel that this is a significant year to present the first report of the Young People's Service League to be brought before a diocesan convention. Until the fall of 1937 the YPSL was almost a separate organization from the rest of the church. At that time we asked to be taken into the Department of Religious Education and since then there has been new life in the league. With financial aid for traveling expenses, wonderful cooperation from the Woman's Auxiliary

and Laymen's League, membership on the Executive Council and finally recognition before the convention we feel that we are really a part of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina.

On February 1, 1938, the Executive Committee of the YPSL started a tour of the leagues in the diocese financed by a grant from the Diocesan Executive Council. At that time there were twenty-three active leagues in this diocese and seven rather inactive ones. There were approximately three hundred active members in these leagues. On sixteen Sundays, from February until June, the Executive Committee of nine members traveled over three thousand miles in a dilapidated 1930 Chevrolet, visiting thirty-seven different churches and reaching 680 young people. In the fall and winter of '38-39 we started over again and since that time have visited forty-one leagues and have talked before over 900 people. At this time there are forty active leagues in the diocese, an increase of ten, and over five hundred active members, an increase of two hundred. At the league convention held at Vade Mecum last June there were 123 persons present, the largest gathering ever held at Vade Mecum, and the largest YPSL convention since 1930, the group being twice the attendance of last year. Four hundred and ninety-four people attended the four district meetings held last fall, an increase of over two hundred over 1937. The most encouraging and astounding fact was the presence of fifteen clergymen.

At the Provincial YPSL Convention held at Sewanee last summer North Carolina reported the largest membership, largest thank offering, by far the most activity, and Florence Lerch and Syd Alexander, two former diocesan presidents, were both unanimously elected respectively to be president and treasurer of the Provincial Organization. In addition, Miss Lerch has been chosen by the National Church to be one of the six official representatives of the Episcopal Church at the World Youth Conference to be held in Amsterdam this summer.

The activities of the league for the past year include: pledging \$400 to the Bishop's Scholarship Fund to help educate church workers, sending over 500 presents to needy children in the Sewanee Missions at Christmas time, assuming the responsibility for organizing and carrying on the mission at Vade Mecum, contributions to the Amsterdam Fund, and many local projects. There are now nineteen names on the Life Service Roll. We have already begun and hope to continue and enlarge plans for forming active service leagues in the colored churches in the diocese. This is a responsibility that has been sidestepped by the church and partly accounts for the small congregations in our Negro churches.

For three years there has been an effort going on in the YPSL to obtain a full time adult worker for the league. The YPSL hit rock bottom about two years ago and is now on the up grade and can be guided to become the surest organization in the church to develop true Christian followers of Christ. An excellent foundation has been

laid for a worker by the Executive Committee but this cannot be continued indefinitely as members of the committee change and there is a definite limit to the amount that this group can do. The youth of today in the church are so constructed that without a leader, guide, and advisor they are lost in the current of everyday affairs. Back in the days of "Ma" Challen and Mr. Haines the league had over 600 members and really accomplished something. Under the guiding hand of a full time worker this can be done again. There is constant reference to the lack of religious tendency among college students, but this dates far back of college; it only becomes evident here. The real cause is insufficient training and knowledge of the church during those years of real development from 14 to 18. A working service league could cure this. The Church as a whole has been content to let the work of the league rest on the individual parish where usually the overworked rector turns it over to the first adult who will take it off his hands. The challenge to the diocese now is to provide for the church of tomorrow by putting a competent person in charge to unify the young people and aid them in their march to the Kingdom of God.

REPORT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE, CHARLOTTE, N. C.
TO THE
CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

In the absence of the Rev. William H. Wheeler who is having a much needed vacation on the West Coast, I have been requested by Mr. Hamilton C. Jones, Chairman of Executive Committee, to present the annual report to this Convention.

The Orphanage has cared, during the past year, for 119 children, of whom 82 were from our Diocese. During the year, 19 children were placed; one in college, three in business positions, three in business schools, twelve with relatives, or parents who have re-established their homes. Twelve children have been received; eight from the Diocese of N. C.

At the present time, there are 97 children in the home. Of these 66 are from the Diocese of N. C. 23 of our children are in the High School, of whom 7 hope to graduate. One of our girls graduating, is planning to enter college and one hopes to receive training to become a nurse. Two of the Seniors belong to the Honor Society; 2 High School students hold class offices and some of them are outstanding in football and basketball. 25 are in the Junior High School with several honor students. 30 are in Grammar Schools of the city, and 10 in the Kindergarten at the Orphanage.

During the year, the health of the children has been very good and the Woman's Co-operative Committee has helped not only in im-

proving the material equipment of the Orphanage and in making the various cottages more attractive, but have provided social opportunities for the children, having sponsored entertainments at the Orphanage and having arranged for the children to go into homes of many of our people in the city.

The Laymen's League of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte, has provided the salary of a former Orphanage boy, who had charge of recreation at the Orphanage during the past summer. Two of our young people in Charlotte have coached basketball teams during the Winter.

Last September, Miss Lida Holt was procured as Supervising Matron.

The Orphanage is very grateful for the generous Thanksgiving Offering which has exceeded by \$1000 the expectancy, but even with this, the Orphanage has found its income not sufficient to take care of its expenditures, and the balance is gradually decreasing each year, until it has now, almost reached the vanishing point. This is quite serious as the Orphanage needs this balance to carry on its work for the first several months before they receive any additional income.

The Executive Committee and the Board of Managers have both felt that it was wise to make a study of the needs of the Orphanage and to develop plans for a more constructive future program; therefore, a special committee was appointed and plans are taking shape for a survey of the needs by trained experts with the hope that we may in the future, be of greater service to the girls and boys committed to the care of our Church.

In the name of the Executive Committee as well as the Board of Managers, we wish to express our appreciation for the great generosity and interest of all of our Church people throughout this Diocese.

REPORT OF ST. AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE

(Including St. Agnes Hospital and the Bishop Tuttle School)

During the past year there has been a total enrollment of 311 students including pupils in the St. Agnes Training School for Nurses and in the Bishop Tuttle Training School for Religious Education and Christian Social Service. This is a small increase over the total enrollment of last year and includes an unusually large Freshman Class in the College. About 25 states, Cuba and the British West Indies are represented in the student body. Texas, Mississippi, Michigan and California are among the distant points from which our students come. An increasing number of them are from our

Negro Parishes thus adding to our Communicant strength and helping to maintain an atmosphere favorable to religious training. St. Augustine's hopes to be of growing usefulness in strengthening our Church Work among our Negro population in all parts of the country. At the college, both on the campus and in the Community there is active Church work. Such organizations as the Woman's Auxiliary, both Senior and Junior Branches, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, the Altar Guild and the Laymen's League are doing definite and effective work. Each year there is a Confirmation Class usually of from ten to twenty members and every year a letter is sent out to all who have been confirmed in the Chapel in recent years asking each one to take part in a Corporate Communion on the fifth Sunday in Lent in our Chapel or if that is not possible to observe the day in some special manner. Our young people hold services at St. Agnes Hospital and frequently sing at a nearby prison camp and at the County Home. Representatives attend numerous religious conferences, both racial and interracial. They have been especially interested in the Annual Conference of our Episcopal College Students at Greensboro. The Lenten offering for Missions amounted to about \$350.00. A project in connection with the Missionary Shortage Fund has also been undertaken.

From time to time representative Negro Clergy occupy the pulpit in St. Augustine's Chapel. The St. Augustine's Conference for Clergy and Church Workers that meets early in June includes an effective Young Peoples Conference and is growing in usefulness. The average attendance is about 100.

During the past year there have also met at St. Augustine's the State Public Welfare Institute for Negro Workers, a conference of the National Negro Recreation Association and the annual meeting of the Crown and Sceptre Club, the State High School Scholarship Society.

Radio broadcasts by members of the Staff and by students have helped to keep our contact with the Alumni and General Public.

By a reciprocal arrangement with Shaw University in Raleigh, there has been an interchange of students in certain courses. Plans are being made to strengthen further the work of each Institution by this and other methods of cooperation.

The question of moving the Bishop Payne Divinity School from Petersburg, Virginia to the vicinity of St. Augustine's College is still being considered by the Trustees of the Bishop Payne School. There seems to be an increasing realization of the strategic importance of St. Augustine's in the development of our Negro Church Work throughout the entire country. As this realization grows we hope and trust that the Institution will receive the larger financial support that is now badly needed.

ST. AGNES HOSPITAL

During the past year St. Agnes Hospital with its Training School for Nurses increased the volume of its already large and useful

work. From May 1, 1938 to May 1, 1939 there were 25,350 Hospital Days, 1419 bed patients, 1924 Clinic Patients, 3904 Out Patient visits and 1110 operations. The Hospital has continued to cooperate with the State Commission for the Blind by holding clinics and admitting patients for observation or operation. It has functioned in the same way in connection with the State Division for Crippled Children. The fact that a large part of its work is on a charitable basis accounts for the substantial aid which it receives each year from the Duke Endowment. Without this aid the work could not go on. Only those closely in touch with what is being done at the Hospital realize the unremitting labor and devotion of the Staff and pupil nurses in the face of financial and material handicaps. The high quality of the work done there is attested by the fact that St. Agnes is accredited by the American Colleges of Surgeons, the American Medical Society and the State Association of Schools for Nurse Training. The graduates of the Training School are being called in increasing numbers to important administrative and supervisory positions in the hospitals of North Carolina and elsewhere. It would be a great satisfaction and encouragement if more of our Church people would become acquainted with St. Agnes and give it a helping hand.

THE BISHOP TUTTLE SCHOOL

This school for training in Religious Education and Social Work is in large part supported by the National Woman's Auxiliary because of the interest of that splendid organization in the training of Church leaders in the field of our Negro work. The course covers two years of theoretical and practical training. In all but exceptional cases the students must be college graduates. This year two graduates of the school are members of its faculty while another is in charge of the Community Centre. The excellent work that is being done by these young women is most gratifying. The Dean, Miss Bertha Richards writes as follows: "The student body is of excellent caliber, with a satisfactory interest in religious education and future work already in prospect. The field work of two of the seniors proved again successful in Winston-Salem and our Cuban Student made a great success of her three months in Philadelphia in the department of religious education of the Diocese. We look forward to her securing appointment in the Cuban field."

In conclusion let me again extend a cordial invitation to the delegates of this Convention and to all of our Church people to visit the Institution and to learn more of what it is doing and of its needs and opportunities.

REPORT OF THE LAYMEN'S LEAGUE

The Laymen's League of the Diocese of North Carolina has had a varied career for the past year, and taking everything into consideration we think that we have made progress in several respects. At the present time, we have, according to Dr. Warren Kearney, Secretary to the National Organization, 33 Branches of the Laymen's League in this Diocese, with a membership of over 1,000, or more than any other Diocese in the United States.

During the past year, most of our work was done individually by Parish organizations, and quite a lot has been accomplished in this respect. We have sent 50 boys to Camp Tise for a week's camping trip. We have sent several Church School workers to various summer Conferences, furnished two presents for every member of the Thompson Orphanage, distributed magazines to shut-ins, visited the sick, and kept up the Diocesan moving pictures, taking all special events and then taking them to all Parishes, and showing them when requested to do so.

The Colored District of the Laymen's League of this Diocese have planned and are now arranging for a Summer Camp for Negro boys a few miles out of Durham. We have reports now on our desk from the Rectors of several of the Parishes that have Leagues, and they say that the League has meant much to their Parish in that it has been the cause of renewed interest of the men in the Church, with a marked increase in attendance, Church giving, and more especially the attendance of the men at the Holy Communion, with interest being centered on the three words of the Laymen's League, which are Serve, Worship, and Share.

By Serve we mean to Serve with the Rector of the Parish in his work of ministering to the congregation.

To Worship regularly at the Church Services, and special attendance at the Holy Communion, depending on this Communion for strength to carry on our work.

To Share our time, money, and influence with our fellow men.

With these three words before us, our aims this year are to sponsor Camp Tise for boys, at Vade Mecum, build a Diocesan Chapel of Thanks at Vade Mecum, which will serve approximately 500 people in the Sourtan Mountains, to sponsor the athletics at Thompson Orphanage, by helping them to have a Director, to help them with their athletic teams, in their travel to various towns to play their games. These are our objectives for this year, and with the advice and encouragement from our beloved Bishop, who has in the past always given us so much of his time, influence, advice and encouragement so freely, and by the Grace of our Heavenly Father we expect to go on.

REPORT OF COLLEGE WORK

A year ago the Student Vestry of the Chapel of the Cross Chapel Hill sent out a letter to the Executive Councils of the three Dioceses of North Carolina requesting that provision be made for the salary of an assistant for student work at Chapel Hill. The councils and conventions acted favorably upon this and we had hoped to have secured the assistant by last September. However, we failed to find the right man available and it is only recently that we have secured the man for this place. He will begin work at Chapel Hill July first. We are depending upon this Diocese to pay the part of the salary that was accepted last year.

The college work in the Diocese has been carried on steadily throughout the past year. There is nothing especially new to report. The workers have remained the same, and the various programs have not altered much. The number of Episcopal students still increases in all of our institutions.

On April 14-16 a Diocesan Conference of Students was held at Saint Mary's House, Greensboro. It was efficiently planned and prepared for by Miss Margaret Williams and a committee from the Woman's College. Delegates from most of the colleges in the Diocese were present and a very interesting conference resulted under the leadership of the Rev. Alden Kelley, the new national secretary for College work. Another conference is planned for the next college year.

On April 18-20 a conference for College workers throughout the Province was held in Auburn, Ala. Miss Margaret Williams, The Rev. J. A. Vache, and the Rev. A. S. Lawrence attended from this diocese.

REPORT OF THE FRANCIS J. MURDOCH SOCIETY

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

Except for a preliminary meeting a year ago the Francis J. Murdoch Memorial Society has held no regular session. At the organization meeting when the assets of the Society were transferred to the care of the Trustees of the Diocese Rev. R. B. Owens was chosen Chairman and Rev. A. S. Lawrence, secretary. Since the plan of the Society was to build up the principal of the fund of \$20,000.00, no money has yet been appropriated; but acting in accordance of Sec. 6 Canon XVIII, the society through one of its members has striven to keep in touch with those men who are thinking of or studying for the ministry. During the week of February 5, 1939 A. S. Lawrence visited the candidates and postulants at the Virginia Seminary and the General Seminary. We have three men at the former and one at the latter. Mr. Lawrence had conferences with these men and talked

to the faculty concerning their work. Besides these men at the seminaries, we have three other postulants, two of whom are expected to enter the seminary next fall. There are also several young men at the University who are seriously considering the call of the ministry. Four of this group are from this Diocese.

In such ways as the above the Society hopes to aid the Bishop in developing and training young men for the ministry.

REPORT OF THE DEAF MISSION IN THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

I respectfully submit the following as the report of my official work for the year covering May 1, 1938 to May 1, 1939.

I have delivered 176 sermons and addresses. I have baptized four infants and two adults; have performed two marriages and officiated one funeral.

I have presented three candidates for Confirmation; two of whom were in St. Paul's, Winston-Salem, and one in St. Andrew's, Greensboro.

Not counting the numbers of deaf persons who attend our regular weekly services in Durham, I have preached to 1412 deaf persons within the year. I visited the North Carolina School for the Deaf in Morganton and delivered chapel talks to the students. All the stations visited by me are improving in their local organiza-

tions and work and the character of the work done is fine and far-reaching.

Again let me, on behalf of the deaf people everywhere, thank our Bishop, Rectors, Laymen and Laywomen who are showing such a fine interest in the welfare and the spiritual life of the deaf people in the Diocese and beyond.

REPORT OF VADE MECUM CAMPS AND CONFERENCES

Camps and Conferences—

The Diocesan Camps and Conferences had a very successful season in 1938. The summer program running from June 5th through September 5th included five camps and five conferences, and offered a training program for all Churchmen over 10 years of age. For girls there was the Camp Penick, Jr., Camp Penick, Sr., and the College Girls Conference. For boys there was Camp Cheshire, Jr., and Camp Cheshire, Sr., and also Camp Tise, the one week scholarship Camp for Boys. The conferences included the Y. P. S. L. Convention, the Woman's Auxiliary Conference, the Laymen's League Conference, and the School of Teacher Training, for Church School Teachers.

Attendance—

Last summer 710 persons attended the Camps and Conferences at Vade Mecum, an increase of 184 over the previous year, and the prospects for 1939 look as though we will have a capacity registration. Each year the registration of non-Episcopalians is growing in leaps and bounds, and therefore our own Church people need to become more cognizant of the opportunities offered by our own Church.

Personnel and Management—

The directors and faculty of the camps and conferences are the very best available. Last year many of our national Church leaders had prominent places on the program, especially at the adult conferences including the College Girls Conference. On the permanent staff of the Camps is the full-time Director and Business Manager, a Registered Nurse, a Dietitian, three cooks, a truck driver, a night watchman, a general handyman, an Office Secretary. This staff is supplemented by a part-time secretary in the Spring (before the season opens), and by several waitresses and maids during the adult Conferences and by a Camp Mother for each of the Junior Camps. In addition there is a full time caretaker and superintendent of the farm and several tenants.

The Vade Mecum Committee—

The Vade Mecum Committee appointed by the Bishop in Convention last year served until the Fall meeting of the Executive Council, at which time a smaller committee consisting of the following were appointed. Rev. Messrs. D. W. Yates, M. G. Henry, A. S. Lawrence, Jr., Mr. J. A. Mackie, and Mrs. W. J. Gordon. This committee met in November at St. Philip's Church, Durham, adopted the 1939 schedule, refused the resignation of the Business Manager, and in turn issued a call to him, upon the advisement of the Bishop, and subject to the consent of the Department of Missions and the Executive Council, to become full time Business Manager of Vade Mecum, priest-in-charge Christ Church, Walnut Cove, St. Philip's Church, Germanton, and the Vade Mecum Chapel, with residence in Walnut Cove. This Call was ratified by the Council in January, and was accepted by Mr. Lawrence, as of March 1, 1939.

Resolution I in the 1938 Vade Mecum report regarding protection for the Diocese of North Carolina through incorporation of the Camps, was cared for by two insurance policies, a Liability Policy, and a Workingman's Compensation policy, taken out in June 1938.

The Trustees of the Vade Mecum Property—

(The Winston-Salem Foundation)

The remainder of the \$6,000.00 grant made by the Winston-Salem Foundation two years ago was disbursed for the repairs and improvements listed in the last report to the Convention. This makes a Total of approximately \$30,000.00 that they have spent for Vade Mecum. Our plant now includes the three story Cheshire Hall, (housing dormitory space, infirmary, kitchen, dining hall, office, storage space and handicraft workshop), Tise Hall (the gymnasium), the 100x40 swimming pool, a modern up-to-date chlorination plant at our own reservoir all equipped with electric lights (on Duke Power line), modern plumbing, hot and cold running water and sewage disposal system. The property now includes 866.7 acres of land with the addition of the 1.7 acres purchased last year.

Even yet, the Diocese of North Carolina has spent nothing on permanent improvements to the property. For this reason the Vade Mecum Committee, with the consent of the Foundation, has undertaken a campaign to raise funds in the Diocese to construct ten cabins, at the cost of \$300.00 each. It is obvious that no more funds will be forthcoming from the Trustees of the property until we take this necessary step, as an assurance of our good faith, and our personal interest in Vade Mecum. After we have constructed these cabins we may rest assured that the Trustees will more than match our contribution with further development of the Vade Mecum property.

Financial Report for Vade Mecum Camps and Conferences—

(May 1 to May 1)

The camps and conferences now in their eighth year of operation at Vade Mecum, have never had to call upon the Diocese for Maintenance. They have been entirely self-supporting. However, during the last year the Diocese has assumed some responsibility towards Vade Mecum in the adoption of a \$1700 item which provides salary for Business Manager, Caretaker, and also pays insurance, and supplements payment for farm maintenance.

Plans for the Future of Vade Mecum—

Beginning with May 26th of this year Vade Mecum will be open for special week-end conferences, retreats and conventions for twelve months in the year. The first of these Conferences will be held May 29-31, and is a Home Demonstration Extension Recreational Conference for the whole Northwest District of the state, to be conducted by leaders from the Nation's Capitol. It is hoped that each Parish and Church institution in the Diocese will take advantage of the opportunities offered at Vade Mecum. It does seem odd that the first conference of this type is to be operated by the U. S. Government, rather than our own Church.

In order to properly care for Fall, Winter, and Spring Conferences the Sparks cottage needs to be reconditioned and equipped with heat, lights and water.

Further plans for the future of Vade Mecum include (1) the construction of ten cabins housing eight campers and a counselor each. (2) The construction of two bath and shower houses. (3) the extension of water and sewage and light systems to care for these new buildings. (4) the renovation of Cheshire Hall. These improvements will allow us to accommodate a mixed young people conference satisfactorily, and will increase our camp capacity to eighty campers, and we will be able to comfortably care for a conference or convention of about 150 persons. We hope that we can issue the invitation to entertain the Diocesan Convention in 1941.

Immediate plans for development of Vade Mecum include the construction of a brick incinerator, reconstruction of the pavilion near the spring, the construction of two good tennis courts, and extensive repairs to the present property.

Plans for the near future include the development of the lake, a well graded athletic field, the reconstruction of the bowling alley, of a scenic driveway to the mineral spring, and a golf course. In addition two new tenant houses, a new barn, and several other farm buildings are greatly needed.

Vade Mecum Chapel—

One of the old out-buildings on the Vade Mecum grounds has been temporarily renovated for use as a chapel for the people of the Vade Mecum Community. Services have been held almost regularly since July of last year. At the present moment the people are interested in building a new chapel at the cross-roads on the Vade Mecum property. They have established a building fund which totals one hundred and forty-seven cents. The Diocesan Laymen's League is interested in this project.

The Challenge of Vade Mecum to the Diocese—

We members of this Diocese have a Diocesan Camp and Conference set up that is unequalled by any other Diocese. The Challenge to make our program a progressive one lies with each one of us. We can continue to operate Vade Mecum successfully and progressively if we do the following things immediately:

1. Contribute generously to the Cabin Building Fund.
2. Provide Scholarships for boys and girls, as well as adults in your Parish.
3. Know the Vade Mecum program, and try to attend your conferences on the program this year.
4. Pray that Vade Mecum may enable us all to grow each year in the knowledge and love of God, as we gather for our meetings there in God's hills.

REPORT OF THE LAY TRUSTEE OF KANUGA

To the Convention, Diocese of North Carolina:

By action of this Convention last year at Tarboro, North Carolina became a participating diocese of the Kanuga Conference and in accordance with Article 3 of the Constitution of Kanuga Conference Association you honored me by election as your lay representative on the Board of Trustees.

Following the call by Bishop Finlay, President of the Board, for a meeting of the Board of Managers at Kanuga to be held July 20, 1938, Bishop Penick complied with Article 7 of the Constitution by appointing the requisite five representatives of this diocese to the Board of Managers as follows:

The Bishop of the Diocese—Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Penick.

One clergyman—Rev. James McDowell Dick.

One layman—Mr. John S. Holmes.

A representative of the Woman's Auxiliary—Mrs. William J. Gordon.

A representative of the Young Peoples' Service League — Mr. Wm. J. Gordon, Jr.

These were all present at this meeting, the first at which this diocese was present in full and responsible representation. The principal topics discussed were the improvement and future man-

agement of the Boys Camp, the most suitable site for the new chapel, and plans for securing funds and constructing the chapel.

This was the last meeting of the Board of Managers at which the well beloved leader and creator of Kanuga, Bishop Kirkman G. Finlay, presided. Some five weeks later, while still in residence and devoting himself to the bodily and spiritual well being of those with whom he came in contact, he passed on to the larger life. Bishop Penick represented the diocese at the funeral in Columbia, South Carolina, where Bishop Finlay had lived and served so long as Priest and Bishop.

At a called meeting of the Board of Managers on Tuesday, October 4, Bishop Robert E. Gribbin, of Western North Carolina, was elected President of the Board to succeed Bishop Finlay, while Bishop Darst of East Carolina retained the vice-presidency. Rev. A. Rufus Morgan of Columbia, always Bishop Finlay's right hand man, assumed the responsibility of additional duties pending more definite arrangements. Plans for the campaign for funds enough to complete the new chapel in time for the 1939 conference were approved and our own Rev. John Long Jackson, who has served Kanuga as Director of Conferences for the past several years, consented to head up the campaign for contributions.

It was stated that \$4,500 of the necessary \$10,000 was already in hand.

The regular annual meeting of the Board was held in Columbia on January 5, 1939, one month earlier than usual; the reason for this being the need for approving or revising plans for the chapel. It was decided to revise the plans so that the estimated cost would not exceed the \$10,000 the maximum figure decided upon before the death of Bishop Finlay.

A building committee composed of the President, the Rev. Mr. Morgan, and one or two others was authorized to give final approval to the plans and to proceed with the building. A part of the necessary lumber is being cut from the property. I learned recently that the erection of the chapel has begun, but that it seems doubtful whether it will be far enough advanced to be used at the conference this summer.

One disadvantage of the early date of the annual meeting was the impossibility of having for consideration the usual financial report as to receipts and expenditures for the previous calendar year. Mr. Morgan who is now acting as a general manager in charge of the property and the building operations, gave a preliminary and rather general statement of expenses and receipts for 1938 and promised a final statement later. The attached supplementary statement received through Bishop Penick about the middle of April may give some idea of conditions at the end of the calendar year 1938.

The trust still owns and holds the same properties as reported in last year's annual account.

The Agricultural Building reported in item five of said account has been completed and fully equipped and is now being used by the pupils of the Ansonville school. About \$2,000 worth of equipment has been placed in said building and the same is a modern and well equipped department. One of the special features of this equipment is a modern sound projection machine for educational films.

The trust has acquired no other property since its last report but has obtained the cooperation of the Works Progress Administration in the development of a National Youth Administration project on the Staton farm. This project will turn said Station place into a modern experimental and educational farm with recreational facilities for students. The trust is obligated to the extent of \$1,250 for materials and the Works Progress Administration will place \$7,300 into the project. Buildings for use as a recreation hall, dining room and kitchen are now being erected on the property and are completed to the extent that they are ready for roofing. Other buildings and dormitories are contemplated for the project. The buildings now under construction should be ready for use by July 1, 1939.

LENTEN OFFERING—1939

90 Church Schools reported a Lenten Offering for 1938. 3 White and 6 Colored Church Schools made no report. The Offering was \$5,753.29. The Church School reporting the largest Offering was Holy Trinity Church, Greensboro, with \$465.83. The highest Offering from a Negro Church School was made by St. Augustine's College, with \$348.87. The largest Missionary Offering came from St. Luke's, Spray, with \$190.56. The second highest Offering in the Diocese was from St. Peter's, Charlotte, with \$381.76.

The one Diocesan Presentation Service held in the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, was a distinct success. In former years, Dis-

strict Services have been held, but this year, for the first time, there was attempted one large service, which was so successful that we are certain that those who attended must feel that a precedent has been set.

The Reverend J. A. Vaché, in organizing the Service, the Reverend C. E. B. Robinson, in writing the Order of Service, the Reverend B. N. Defoe Wagner, in Constructing the Ark used in the Service, deserve special mention.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF SAINT MARY'S SCHOOL, INCORPORATED

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of incorporation the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith the report of this Board for the Academic year 1938-39.

Since the Diocesan Convention of 1938 the following important meetings of the governing boards of Saint Mary's have been held: May 26, 1938, Executive Committee; May 31st, 1938, Semi-Annual meeting of the Board of Trustees; August 26, 1938, Executive Committee; February 9th, 1939, Executive Committee; February 23rd, 1939, Executive Committee.

* * * * *

Since my last report two of our Trustees have passed on: The Hon. Geo. W. Connor, of the Diocese of North Carolina and the Right Rev. Kirkman G. Finlay, Bishop of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina.

The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes of the Diocese of North Carolina has been elected a Board member and member of the Executive Committee; Mrs. A. B. Stoney of Morganton, North Carolina, has joined the Board as representative from the Diocese of Western North Carolina, and the Rev. Maurice Clarke of Camden, South Carolina, has become a member for the Diocese of Upper South Carolina.

During the summer of 1938 an extensive painting and refurnishings program was carried out adding materially to the happiness and comfort of the students. A Utility and Playroom was developed on the third floor of Holt Hall which has been greatly enjoyed during the present session. In the Infirmary and Annex new rift pine floors have been laid and needed furnishings added.

Library expansion: An extended study of this subject has resulted in the decision to devote the entire first floor of the Art Building to Library use, the necessary changes to begin immediately after the close, May 30th, of the present session. This will necessitate rearrangement of class room space, chiefly on the first floor of West Wing. Already a new studio for the head of the Music Department has been added to the Music Building, all

of the old dilapidated out-buildings have been removed, and a building for the storage of school supplies is under construction.

Progress has been made in the landscaping of the campus and a new entrance has been opened from College Avenue. (Fire Protection Program.)

The 1938-39 session opened on September 15th with a capacity enrollment. To date the registration of 221 Resident Students and 77 Day and Special Students have been accepted. The session has been a most satisfactory one from all viewpoints.

Twenty-one states are represented in Resident Student enrollment with also one student each from China and the West Indies. North Carolina leads with 113 students, then in order come Virginia, 35; Georgia, 12; South Carolina, 9; Washington, D. C., and Alabama, six each; New York and Pennsylvania, four each; Ohio, Maryland, Florida, three each; Texas, Mississippi, West Virginia, New Jersey, Tennessee and Colorado, two each; with Oklahoma, Louisiana, Kentucky, California also represented by one registration.

The strong work of the Special Departments has been marked this year by a number of distinctions:

The Department of Dramatics won first prize in its class in the State-wide contest at Chapel Hill.

The Home Economics Department won first prize over all contestants in a State-wide contest held in Raleigh in April.

The Art Department won three individual first prizes in water color and drawing at the State-wide contest in Chapel Hill.

A Saint Mary's student won first prize in singing in the State-wide Music contest held in Greensboro.

The 1938 Annual was awarded first prize in its class at the recent Press Conference in Greensboro.

Of our total enrollment, Resident and Day Students, the religious denominations represented are: Episcopal, 165; Methodist, 49; Presbyterian, 35; Baptist 25; Christian, 8; other denominations Roman Catholic, Lutheran, Reform.

As this report is written we have accepted 186 applications of returning and new students for the 1939-40 session which opens in mid-September, assuring another capacity enrollment. Of this number 106 are returning students.

A condensed financial statement of the Assets and Liabilities of

GOOD SAMARITAN HOSPITAL—REPORT FOR 1938

Marking the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Good Samaritan Hospital, the year 1938 has been outstanding in accomplishment and activity, in the work of caring for the sick and suffering of the Negro race of this community.

In January a modern, well-equipped Maternity Wing was opened, and during the year over 200 mothers and babies have been cared for. Needed repairs were made on the second floor of the older part of the building, including the making over of one room into a fracture room, equipped with a splendid fracture table, a gift of a friend

of the hospital. In February the hospital purchased the lot on the southwest corner of Mint and Hill Streets, adjoining the hospital property.

Time and thought have not been spared in improving and maintaining the Training School, and it is the aim of the hospital to provide a high type of training at all times.

The Fiftieth Anniversary was commemorated in September with appropriate services in the Chapel and the unveiling of a portrait of Mrs. Jane Renwick Wilkes, founder of the hospital.

We wish to express our grateful appreciation to the many friends of the hospital, especially St. Peter's Church and the Duke Endowment, without whose generous gifts and unflinching interest, the hospital could not have carried on.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH

The outstanding things to report about the University of the South during the past year are two. The first is the transformation of the buildings and property as the result of extensive renovations made possible by a loan of \$75,000 that was negotiated for this purpose. This was a very wise investment that checked deterioration, made the University much more comfortable, and enhanced its beauty.

The second great happening of the year was a campaign to secure a Sustaining Fund for Sewanee of \$100,000 per year for five years. This is greatly needed to prevent the continued incurring of an annual deficit of some \$35,000 and to remove a floating, i.e. unsecured, indebtedness of \$160,000. The permanent solution to these problems is to secure more endowment, but people won't give endowment, nor will foundations make grants, to an institution that is on such a shaky financial basis that its permanence

seems questionable. So if Sewanee can be placed on a secure financial foundation for five years by means of the Sustaining Fund, the Vice-chancellor hopes during the interim to secure the endowment necessary to enable it to operate independently and without loss thereafter. Accordingly he organized and acted as chairman of a Sustaining Fund campaign, which began in February, 1939, and is being brought to a close in May. The latest report was that statements of intent to give so much per year for five years had been secured from alumni, Church members, and friends totaling \$410,000 for the whole period, \$90,000 short of the goal. We may assume that in accordance with the plan, one-fifth of this amount was definitely pledged for the year 1939.

These changes and other less tangible ones for the progress and improvement of the University are the first-fruits of the vice-chancellorship of Dr. Alexander Guerry, whose acceptance last year of this office began a new day in which the dream of Sewanee bids fair to be realized. He deserves our utmost cooperation. Under his leadership Sewanee has a splendid opportunity to become what it was intended to be and to render the signal service to the Church in training young men that no other institution is so capable of doing. This hope can be fulfilled if churchmen will give their fullest support, financially and by sending students, to the last college owned by our Church.

Journal of Proceedings

FIRST DAY

Charlotte, N. C., May 7, 1940

The one hundred and twenty-fourth annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina was held in St. Peter's Church, Charlotte, N. C., beginning Tuesday, May 7.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 a. m. with the Bishop as Celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Willis G. Clark, D.D.

At 9:30 a. m. Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Robert M. Man and the Rev. Willis G. Clark, D.D.

At 10:15 the Bishop called the Convention to order. The secretary called the roll. A quorum in both orders being found present, the Bishop declared the Convention duly organized. On nomination, the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence was elected secretary. He appointed the Rev. Daniel W. Allen as his assistant.

The Senior Warden of St. Peter's parish, Mr. J. A. Mayo, then welcomed the Convention.

The Chair appointed as a Committee on Credentials Rev. James M. Dick, Clarence E. Frick and Samuel J. Hinsdale.

The Bishop then read a telegram from the Presiding Bishop as follows:

To the Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Penick:

Through your Diocesan Convention, may I express to you and your people my sincere best wishes and a call to go forward in the important year ahead. The last decade has been one of darkness in the world. We must now set our faces to the new decade before us, determined to turn to victory what now seems defeat. Christ came at a time when the world seemed doomed. God chose that as the fullness of time for Jesus to come, and through His life and work and sacrifice on the cross He reversed what seemed to be a current of defeat moving in human society. The Church can do the same today if she but wills it. I know we can count on the Diocese of North Carolina doing her share.

H. ST. GEORGE TUCKER, *Presiding Bishop.*

On motion, the printed program was adopted as the schedule of the Convention.

The Bishop then called the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes to the chair, and read his annual address. (See Appendix A).

The Bishop resumed the chair, and the report of the Standing Committee was read by Mr. Joseph B. Cheshire. (Page 113).

The report of the Executive Council was presented by the Rev. David W. Yates. (Page 114). As part of this report, Mr. Stephen E. Burroughs presented the budget for Episcopal Maintenance for 1941 and also the budget for the Church's Program for 1941.

Of the resolutions attached to the report, Resolutions 1, 2, 3, dealing with the pension Fund, were adopted. Resolution 4, naming the Security National Bank, Raleigh Unit, as treasurer, was adopted. Resolution 5 was first amended, by changing "shall" to "may" in section (a), and by adding "Upon nomination of the Bishop" in section (b).

After considerable discussion, a substitute motion was introduced by the Rev. John A. Wright.

RESOLVED: That the question of the Executive Secretaryship be referred to a special committee of five to study this question or other means of assistance to the administrative head of the Diocese, and to report to the 1941 Convention.

The substitute motion prevailed by a vote of 64 to 59.

The hour of noon having arrived, prayers for missions were said by the Bishop.

To secure time for nominations, the consideration of the rest of the report of the Executive Council was postponed until 2:30 p. m.

Nominations were then made as in the Rules of Order. For the position of Trustee of St. Mary's School, to fill out an unexpired term, the only nominee was the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes. On motion, the rules were suspended, and the secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. Hughes, and the Chair declared him elected.

The secretary presented a letter from Mrs. Ashby Lee

Baker, submitting her resignation from the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage. The resignation was accepted, with thanks and appreciation of her past services.

Col. Joseph Hyde Pratt presented the following resolution, which was adopted unanimously:

RESOLVED: That the members of this Convention assure the Rev. Robert Bruce Owens of their sympathy and affection, and express to him how keenly they miss him and his guidance at this Convention.

A recess for lunch was then taken.

At 2:30 p. m. the Convention re-assembled, and the report of the Executive Council was again considered. Resolutions 6 and 7 were adopted. The budget for Episcopal Maintenance was amended by omitting all provision for an Executive Secretary, and by adding \$800 to "Diocesan Property". So amended, it was adopted, a total of \$11,856.05.

The budget for the Church's Program was adopted as presented, a total of \$64,170.90. (However, on the second day \$100 was added to this amount. See Page 30). (The budgets as finally adopted are printed on Page 117).

The whole report of the Executive Council was then adopted.

The report of the Chancellor was read by Mr. Alexander B. Andrews. (Page 119).

The report of the Historiographer was read by Dr. Lawrence F. London. (Page 120).

The report on the state of the Church was read by the Rev. John Q. Beckwith, Jr. (Page 120).

The report of the Trustees was read by Mr. Joseph B. Cheshire. (Page 123). The report was referred to a committee of three: D. E. Hudgins, Julius A. Mackie, John H. Cutter.

The Rev. J. M. Dick reported for the committee on Credentials that several churches were late in choosing their delegates, but that the committee recommended that all delegates be seated in accordance with certificates filed with the Secretary.

The Treasurer's report was presented by Mr. J. M. Sink, Jr. (Page 83).

The report of the Woman's Auxiliary was read by Mrs. W. S. Holmes. (Page 125).

The report of the Trustees of St. Mary's School was made by the Bishop. (Page 126).

The report of the Thompson Orphanage was presented by the Rev. W. H. Wheeler. (Page 128).

The report of the University of the South was made by the Rev. David W. Yates. (Page 129).

Mr. H. C. Worrall reported for the Layman's League.

The report of the Y. P. S. L. was made by Mr. William J. Gordon, Jr. (Page 130).

On motion a vote of confidence in Mr. Gordon's leadership, and in recognition of the Young people's work, was adopted.

The report of St. Augustine's College was read by the Rev. Edgar H. Goid. (Page 131).

Rev. Henry F. Kloman spoke on Saint Mary's School.

The Rev. A. Stratton Lawrence, Jr. reported for Vade Mecum. (Page 133).

The Bishop then appointed the Canonical Committees. (Page 7).

It being 5 o'clock, the Convention took a recess until 8 p. m.

At 8 p. m. the Convention reassembled for a special service. The Bishop preached the sermon, and the offerings of the congregation were received for the New York Bible and Cammon Prayer Book Society.

WEDNESDAY

The Holy Communion was celebrated in St. Peter's Church at 7:30 a. m., with the Bishop as Celebrant, assisted by the Rector, the Rev. Willis G. Clark, D.D., and the Rev. C. E. B. Robinson.

At 9:30 a. m., Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. W. P. Price and the Rev. Willis G. Clark, D.D.

At 10:15 the Bishop called the Convention to order. The minutes of the proceedings of the previous day were read and approved.

The Rev. Willis G. Clark, D.D., read a message to the Convention, just received from the Rt. Rev. John Long Jackson, the newly consecrated Bishop of Louisiana. On motion, Dr. Clark was requested to send a suitable reply.

The Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence then presented the report on College Work. (Page 136).

He also submitted by title the reports of the Board of Examining Chaplains and of the Murdoch Memorial Society. (Pages 136, 137).

Mr. Ralph B. Coit presented the report of the Church Pension Fund and was again thanked by the convention for the work he has done. (Page 137).

On motion of the Rev. W. J. Gordon the Secretary was instructed to send greetings to the clergy absent on account of sickness.

The Bishop appointed as a committee to reply to the telegram of the Presiding Bishop, the Rev. Robert E. Roe and Dr. Urban T. Holmes.

Mr. W. C. Cagle presented the report of the Smith Vocational Trust. The report was referred to a committee consisting of Mr. R. E. Lasater, Mr. Frank E. Winslow, Mr. W. Landon Hill. Upon recommendation of this committee, the report was approved. The report is on file with the secretary.

The ballots were then distributed. The Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence offered the following resolution which was adopted:

RESOLVED: That in the event of there being no election on the first ballot for any place to be voted on, then on the next and subsequent ballots only twice the number of nominees for places to be filled be voted on, chosen from those highest in order on the preceding ballot.

On motion the rules were suspended, and the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the convention for the nominees where there was no contest. The Bishop declared these persons elected.

The chair appointed as tellers the Rev. C. Alfred Cole,

Mr. Harold C. Bird, the Rev. Leicester F. Kent, and Mr. Cameron MacRae.

The hour of noon having arrived, the Bishop offered prayers for missions.

Mr. J. S. Hinsdale then extended the invitation of the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, to the Convention to meet there next year. The invitation was accepted with thanks.

Mr. Frank E. Winslow reported for the Committee on Social Security for Lay Employees as follows:

After a full investigation of the subject, the committee has reached the conclusion that as there is a strong probability of Congress enacting a law that will include Church lay employees under the Social Security Act, it will be unwise and unnecessary for the convention to take any action at this time. We respectfully request the committee be discharged.

The report was accepted and the committee discharged.

The Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence reported for the Committee on Canons:

Your Committee on Canons respectfully reports that it has considered the matters referred to it at the last Convention, viz.

1. An addition to Canon XXIII, Of the Filling of Vacant Cures. Your Committee finds it almost impossible to define an aided parish, and we believe that the new section 2, adopted last year covers sufficiently all parochial vacancies. We therefore offer the following resolution:

“Resolved: That a new section 5 be added to Canon XXIII, to read:—In case of a vacancy in a diocesan organized mission, the Bishop shall appoint the minister-in-charge for a term of not more than four years; at the end of such term the minister-in-charge may be re-appointed.”

2. A resolution looking to a change in the system of balloting. There seems to be much difference of opinion as to this ballot in the conventions where it has been tried. Your committee believes that our present system is satisfactory, and therefore offers the following:

Resolved: That there be no change in the method of balloting, and that we be discharged from further consideration of the matter.

3. Other new matters have also been referred to us. With the change in the method of paying the Church Pension Fund Pre-

miums, of necessity there must be changes in the Canon. To make the Canon harmonize with the action of this Convention, we offer the following resolutions:

Resolved: That Canon XXX, Of the Church Pension Fund, be amended as follows:

- a. Omit subsection 4 of Section 2, and renumber subsections 5 and 6 as 4 and 5.
- b. Add a new subsection 6, to read:—"To furnish quarterly a complete report to the Executive Council or its Finance Department."
- c. In Section 3, subsection 1, omit in lines 4 and 8 the words "to the Committee of the Church Pension Fund."
- d. Omit the same words in Section 3, subsections 2, 3, and 4.
- e. Omit Section 7.

4. A proposed amendment to Canon XX has been referred to us, dealing with the matter of salary obligations. Your committee asks for further time to consider this amendment.

5. A proposed amendment to Canon XXII as to the method of filling a vacancy in a Vestry, has been referred to us. For this also your committee asks for further time for consideration.

6. A further addition to Canon XXII, looking to permission for a Vestry to select a secretary not a member of the Vestry.

Your committee is of the opinion that no change in the canons is necessary. Subject to the Canons, the Vestry may make its own rules. We ask therefore to be discharged from further consideration of the subject.

All the resolutions of this report were adopted.

The Rev. Roma C. Fortune then presented his report by sign, the Bishop reading it. The Convention received the report with a standing vote of appreciation. (Page 139).

The Rev. Robert E. Roe, reporting for the special committee, read the following as an answer to the telegram of the Presiding Bishop:

To the Rt. Rev. H. St. George Tucker:

Your telegram was read to our assembled convention and our delegates were greatly moved. It is the deep conviction of our group that Christianity and the forces of light are growing ever stronger and that their victory is not far distant.

We recognize your message to the diocese of North Carolina as the words of a wise spiritual leader and world statesman. We gratefully acknowledge your blessing as from the Presiding Bishop of the Church.

The report was adopted and the telegram sent.

On motion of the Rev. Henry F. Kloman, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED: That wording of the Department of Religious Education be changed to Christian Education; also that the Department of Social Service be changed to Christian Social Relations to conform to the wording of these Departments as changed by the National Council.

The Rev. James D. Beckwith presented the report of the Commission on Faith and Order. (Page 140). On motion, recommendation 2 was amended, as in the printed report. The report was received with appreciation, and the Commission, at its own request, was continued.

Several delegates spoke in a discussion of this report.

The Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, Jr. offered the following resolution which was adopted:

RESOLVED: That an item of \$100.00 be added to the budget of the Department of Christian Education in order that the recommendation of the Commission on Faith and Order, relative to this Department, be carried into effect. It will be No. 18 under subsection (b) and entitled Commission on Faith and Order.

On motion of Mr. Alexander B. Andrews the Bishop appointed as a special committee to draft a memorial to J. Renwick Wilkes—Rev. Willis G. Clark, Mr. A. L. Boyle, Sr., and Mr. W. Ruffin Smith. For a memorial to Henry M. London — Rev. James M. Dick, Mr. Graham H. Andrews, and Mr. G. H. Pilkington. (The memorial minutes, as later prepared, are here inserted).

HENRY MAUGER LONDON

Born April 11, 1879

Died December 30, 1939

Henry Mauger London's three great interests were his Church, his State, and his University. These three institutions were always in his thoughts and actions. As Churchman, citizen and alumnus he had no superior.

Coming of a family never absent from the Councils of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina from its organization in 1817 to this day, he was one of the most useful and active Churchmen of that unusual family.

He was a member of the Vestry of The Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, and its Secretary for 23 years. He represented this Parish in most of the Diocesan Conventions, and he was also

a delegate for the Diocese in our General Conventions. For 20 years he was Treasurer of the Diocese of North Carolina. In all of his Church activities he has shown a very remarkable fidelity, energy, interest, and practical usefulness. In no small degree did he wear himself out in the service of his Church and State.

"One of the finest servants our Church in North Carolina has ever had." (Bishop Penick). The Diocese gives thanks to God for the long and useful life of this loyal Churchman. He will be missed as only those who have earned both respect and affection can be missed.

"Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

JAMES RENWICK WILKES, JR.

1871—1939

Born in Charlotte on July 10th, 1871, he was a life-long member of the Church in the Diocese of North Carolina. In early infancy he was baptized and in early youth he was confirmed. His interest in the Church was zealous and constant.

Under his direction and with much of his personal and material aid the present Church of St. Martin's Parish was built in memory of his father.

He was elected the first Senior Warden of St. Martin's Parish. For a number of years he served his Parish as Warden, Vestryman, and as Treasurer. He was one of its representatives at many Diocesan Conventions.

He was a Deputy of the Diocese at two General Conventions of the Church.

He served the Diocese on the Executive Council and on some of its most important Committees.

For nineteen years he was Diocesan Treasurer of the Church's Program Fund to which he gave consecrated and efficient labor.

On April 19th, 1939, the Summons from on High came to him. He answered It in the Assurance of his Faith in Christ Jesus to Whom he faithfully bore his witness through the Church which he loved and served.

"Blessed are they that do His Commandments, that they may have the right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates of the City."

Mr. D. E. Hudgins reported for the committee to whom was referred to the report of the Trustees of the Diocese.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO CONSIDER
THE REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN TRUSTEES

The undersigned Committee respectfully reports that following its appointment, a meeting of the Committee was held and the Report of the Diocesan Trustees was submitted and considered.

It appears that the records of the Trustees have been carefully maintained and that the arrangement whereby Security National Bank is acting as custodian is functioning efficiently and satisfactorily both with respect to the general combined Trusts, and with respect to the Murdoch Trust for the Increase of the Ministry.

The gross income yield of 4.604% and the net income yield of 4.374% are gratifying and represent increases over the income received from the Trusts in the preceding year.

The matter of insurance upon Mission property owned by the Diocese is a recurrent question which must be handled eventually by the adoption of a permanent plan. The Missions in many instances have failed to meet their assessments for insurance and the Convention yesterday rescinded the action of the last Convention with regard to preferential use, for insurance premium payments, of contributions made by the Missions to the Diocesan Treasury.

The inclusion of a \$500.00 item for insurance premiums in the new budget represents only a temporary solution of the problem and is an interim measure designed to provide funds to prevent lapsation of insurance.

After considering the question of insurance premiums at some length, the Committee is of the opinion that the following are possible solutions of the problem:

(a.) To include the entire amount of the insurance premium on Mission property in the regular Diocesan budget for the Church's program and to require the Mission to make proportionately larger contributions to other essential expenditures required as a part of the Mission's maintenance—adoption of this method would recognize the direct responsibility of the Diocese for insurance protection of the Mission property owned by the Diocese.

(b.) To include the entire amount of insurance premiums on Mission property in the regular annual Diocesan budget for the Church's program and to assess the Missions for their respective pro rata portions of the insurance premiums — adoption of this method would recognize the primary responsibility for insurance premiums on Mission property as resting upon the Missions themselves, but, if, as in the past, the Missions fail to pay their insurance assessments, the Diocese would be confronted with the alternatives of remitting the assessments or making direct subsidies or loans to the delinquent Missions with the net burden falling, in effect, on the Diocesan funds.

The Committee does not feel that it is the proper body to offer resolutions with regard to the matter of insurance premiums on Mission property, but is of the opinion that the matter is of such serious and grave concern, that the entire question should be referred to the Executive Council for definite action as to existing delinquencies in insurance premium payments and for study during the ensuing year, with the request that definite recommendation as to a permanent plan be submitted to the next annual Diocesan Convention.

The Committee, therefore, presents the following resolutions:

(1.) That the Report of the Trustees of the Diocese be approved and accepted by the Convention with the appreciation of the Convention for the fine services of the Trustees.

(2.) That the matter of handling and financing insurance premium payments upon Mission property owned by the Diocese be referred to the Executive Council with authority vested in the Council to take definite and final action with regard to existing delinquencies and with instructions that the Council study the general question during the ensuing year and make definite recommendations to the next annual Diocesan Convention concerning a permanent plan covering the entire question of insurance on Mission property.

At one o'clock a recess for lunch was taken. At 2:15 the Convention reassembled.

Mr. John S. Holmes read his report as Trustee of Kanuga. (Page 141).

A resolution looking to changes in eligibility for election on the Executive Council was presented and referred to the Committee on Canons to report at the next Convention.

The Bishop nominated as a Board of Examining Chaplains—Rev. R. Bruce Owens, Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence, Rev. F. Craighill Brown, Rev. Edgar H. Goold, Rev. B. N. Defoe Wagner. These Nominations were confirmed by the Convention.

Rev. Ralph A. Bridges presented a report of the Lenten Offering. (Page 142).

Rev. C. Alfred Cole offered a resolution on the preferential ballot which was lost.

Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence presented the report of the Good Samaritan Hospital by title. (Page 143).

Rev. A. Stratton Lawrence, Jr. offered the following resolution:

Whereas: Many missions in the Diocese are receiving aid from the Department of Missions and the missions are assessed each year for the Church's Program pledge, from which fund their aid is received.

And Whereas: Such items as Insurance Premiums on Mission property and Church Pension Fund Premiums go unpaid from year to year—

Be it Resolved: That these missions, at the discretion of the Department of Missions be exempt from the Church's Program assessment with definite understanding that an amount equal to or greater than the assessment be assessed by the mission for local support; i. e. salary and premiums; and that an amount equal to

the assessment be deducted from salary paid to Missionaries by the Diocese—

Be it further Resolved: That such Missions be expected to take the usual special Diocesan and Lenten Offerings.

The resolution was referred to the Executive Council with power to act.

Rev. Isaac W. Hughes read the following resolution which was adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved: That with a happy consciousness of the ease, comfort, and convenience with which it has accomplished its work, all made possible by a fine courtesy and gracious hospitality—manifested on every hand with most kindly detail—the 124th annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina desires to express to the Rector, Vestry, and congregation of St. Peter's Church its deep and sincere gratitude, and assures them of permanent and joyous memories in the days to come.

Rev. William S. Turner offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved: That this 124th Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina, having reaffirmed our belief in the Christian Faith, give its command to go forward in translating our Christian Faith into action to all agencies of the Diocesan Family, especially the Departments of Missions and Church Extension, Christian Education, Christian Social Relations, Field and Publicity, and the Department of Finance; that they determine that the year 1940-1941 shall be a year of definite advancement in every possible way of our Christian Faith.

And further: that this Convention earnestly accept for every baptized member of the Diocese the full, corporate, and individual responsibility for our obligations as members of our Church in this Diocese, and that we pledge that we will consecrate our efforts to the fulfillment, under God's grace, of our responsibility and privilege of extending and deepening our Christian Faith.

On motion, Mr. Sebor M. Lockhart was elected Trustee of the Smith Vocational Trust to take the place of Bennett D. Nelme, deceased.

The Bishop nominated as members of the Murdoch Memorial Society for a two year term Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence, Rev. David W. Yates, Mr. Francis O. Clarkson. The nominations were confirmed by the Convention.

Rev. I. Harding Hughes submitted by title the Re-

port of the North Carolina Churchman and then spoke informally on the needs of the paper. (Page 144).

On motion the deputies to General Convention were made delegates to the Provincial Synod if there should be a meeting of such Synod this year.

The minutes of the second day were then read and approved.

After the singing of the *Gloria in Excelsis* and the Benediction by the Bishop the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

APPENDIX A

ADDRESS AND JOURNAL OF THE BISHOP

Address of the Bishop

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

I welcome you to the 124th Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina. We are meeting in a parish that has enjoyed a recognized position of leadership in this diocese for many years. St. Peter's is becoming an old parish. It will celebrate its Centennial in 1945. Its distinction, however, is not its long history so much as its remarkable energy and the variety of its missionary expression. For out of this parent congregation and the inspiration that it has supplied for almost a century have come three other parishes and two missions now located within the city limits, one mission about ten miles distant in Mecklenburg County, or within walking distance of Charlotte, in Bishop Cheshire's time, one mission in Monroe, the Thompson Orphanage, St. Peter's Hospital and the Good Samaritan Hospital. This versatility in missionary productiveness reached its zenith during the fruitful rectorship of the Reverend Joseph Blount Cheshire, that extended from 1881 until his election as Bishop Coadjutor in 1893. While this parish has not added to its institutional development since 1920, when the present brick church of the Chapel of Hope was built in North Charlotte, the same missionary zeal has been active in the hearts of rectors and congregation alike, manifesting itself in gifts of money and of life, for no parish has supported the Church's program more generously, nor given more sons to the ministry or daughters to the mission field.

How happy we are to meet again in this mother Episcopal Church of Mecklenburg! In this critical year, when Christian forces in many countries are disturbed, if not demoralized, it helps to restore our confidence in the eternal values for which the Church stands, to be reminded of a missionary tradition that has lived on in this parish from generation to generation, with its vision of more and more to be done in Christ's name, with its habits

of generous giving, and its impulse to share its life with a sin-sick world. Our host parish has to her credit a trilogy of achievement, evangelism, medical ministration to both white and Negro races, a national pioneer in the latter field, and the institutional care of indigent children. Under the encouragement and stimulus of this full accomplishment, we sit down to take counsel of the things pertaining to God's Kingdom in these perilous days.

* * * * *

Twenty years have passed since the One Hundred and Fourth Annual Convention met in this church. Let us observe a few ways in which the Diocese has grown in these two decades, and recognize in these vital statistics the evidence of God's watchful Providence over His Church. I take these figures from the Diocesan Journals of 1920 and 1939.

We are entitled to derive encouragement from these comparisons and a renewal of confidence that the Spirit of God abides in His Church, demonstrating over and over again that when men are loyal enough to "plant and water", He will give the increase.

NECROLOGY

On January 18, 1939, the Reverend William John Wright, retired Priest of this Diocese, died at his home in Maryland. In my Convention address of last year I referred to Mr. Wright and his ministry in this diocese. We renew our appreciation for his life and character.

On December 27, 1939, the Reverend Frederick Henry Townsend Horsfield, retired Priest of this diocese since 1926, died in Pass Christian, Mississippi, at the age of eighty-seven. Dr. Horsfield, a native of New York, came to North Carolina in 1907 from the Diocese of East Caro-

lina, where he had served parishes both at Wilmington and at Goldsboro. For nineteen years he was the respected and beloved rector of St. Stephen's Church, Oxford. He is gratefully remembered by his parishioners and other friends as a rare combination of strength and gentleness. Strong in his convictions regarding the Church, he taught his people well. The sons and daughters of his instruction are a loyal generation of Churchmen today. Together with the positiveness of his convictions he invariably showed a genial charitableness towards those whose ideas were different from his own. Despite his scholarly attainments, which were considerable, especially in the field of devotional literature, he was an humble and unassuming man. Since his retirement, he has scrupulously observed the canonical requirement to give an annual account of his ministry. Even these formal communications to his bishop have been full of wisdom and edged with wit, poking fun at himself for growing old, chuckling at the foibles of human weakness, and with the simplicity of a child, reposing his fading strength in the Almightyness of God.

Last year, two laymen died, both officers of the diocese, whose names we mention with honor. James Renwick Wilkes, Treasurer of the Church's Program, fell asleep on April 19th, and on December 30th Henry Mauger London, Treasurer of the Diocese, followed him into the land of rest. These two faithful laymen, both heirs of an honorable Church tradition, were first in integrity and in loyalty to their responsible tasks for over twenty years. Like true sons, they gave their good talents to their beloved Church and counted this service their highest joy.

CHANGES IN PERSONNEL

The losses to the Diocese from the ranks of the clergy, in addition to those whom death has removed, have been as follows:

March 21, 1939, the Reverend George A. Fisher, Rector of St. Ambrose Church, Raleigh, resigned to accept a call to the Diocese of Kentucky, to which diocese he has been transferred.

June 10, 1939, the Reverend David Thurber Eaton's resignation as Rector of the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, became effective. At the request of the Bishop of Wyoming, I transferred Mr. Eaton to that Missionary District on March 16, 1940.

August 1, 1939, the Reverend Frank DeVinney Dean resigned as Priest in Charge of Trinity Church, Mount Airy, and Galloway Memorial Church, Elkin, and retired from the active ministry under the total and permanent disability provisions of the Church Pension Fund. His status is that of a retired Priest of this Diocese.

September 1, 1939, the Reverend Frank Easton Pulley resigned as Rector of Calvary Church, Wadesboro, and Priest in Charge of All Souls Mission, Ansonville, and Christ Church Mission, Albemarle, and was transferred to the Diocese of South Florida.

October 2, 1939, the Reverend Charles U. Harris, Jr., resigned his charge at All Saints, Roanoke Rapids, and St. Luke's, Northampton County, to enter the Union Theological Seminary in New York City to do graduate work.

To all of these clergymen who have gone out from among us, we express our appreciation for the services they rendered in this diocese, and we wish for them continued success in their new fields of labor.

These losses have been offset by the following gains:

March 1, 1939, the Reverend Edward Brailsford Guerry became Rector of St. Luke's Church, Salisbury. He has also become Priest in Charge of St. Peter's Mission in that city.

July 1, 1939, the Reverend Henry Nutt Parsley, from the Diocese of East Carolina, came to us from Amherst, where he had been doing student work, and became Priest in Charge of St. Joseph's and St. Andrew's Missions, Durham. He is also working among the Episcopal students at Duke University.

September 1, 1939, the Reverend James Stanley Cox, formerly of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, began his

ministry in this diocese as Rector of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, and Priest in Charge of associated missions in Alamance County.

ORDINATIONS

On June 18, 1939, in the Church of the Messiah, Mayodan, I ordained to the Diaconate William Penn Price, Candidate for Holy Orders. The following Deacons were advanced to the Priesthood:

May 29, the Reverend Robert Martin Man, in the Church of the Messiah, Rockingham.

June 1, the Reverend Gray Temple, in Calvary Church, Tarboro.

June 21, the Reverend Louis Aldworth Haskell, in St. Saviour's Church, Raleigh.

October 2, the Reverend Charles Upchurch Harris, Jr., in Christ Church Chapel, Raleigh.

To bring this record down to May first, it becomes necessary to mention the resignation of the Reverend Gray Temple on April 1, 1940, as assistant Rector of Calvary Parish, Tarboro, and Priest in Charge of certain Edgecombe County missions. I have transferred him to the Diocese of Virginia.

Since the first of this year, the Reverend William M. Latta has been transferred to this diocese from East Carolina, and has already made his ministry felt at Calvary, Wadesboro, and All Souls, Ansonville.

Also, on January 2, the Reverend Robert Josiah Johnson, D.D., came to us from Arkansas to take charge of the group of missions comprising All Saints, Warrenton, St. Luke's, Warren County, and St. Anna's, Littleton. He has already presented two classes for confirmation.

We must also record the resignation of the Reverend Jesse Starns Lockaby, Rector of St. Andrew's Parish, Charlotte, on April 30, 1940. On the same date the Reverend John Long Jackson terminated a distinguished rectorship at St. Martin's, Charlotte, that began September 15, 1914. Mr. Jackson resigned to accept the election to

the Bishopric of Louisiana, to which office he was consecrated on May 1st in Trinity Cathedral, New Orleans. We are grateful for the magnificent leadership that Bishop Jackson has exercised in this diocese, particularly in the field of Religious Education, and we anticipate for him a notable degree of success in his wider sphere of influence. The friends of Bishop Jackson will like to think of him presiding over his diocesan conventions with a gavel in his hand fashioned from the limb of a white oak tree that stood in the yard of Colonel William Polk in Raleigh, where Leonidas Polk, the first Bishop of Louisiana, was born.

We observe in passing that within the past twenty-two years the Diocese of North Carolina has furnished four bishops to the Church.

* * * * *

Since the last Diocesan Convention, important administrative changes have been made at the Thompson Orphanage. The Reverend William H. Wheeler has resigned as Superintendent after eighteen years of indefatigable labor. During his term of office, the institution has been practically rebuilt. It was his leadership that projected and carried through to completion an extensive plan of modernization, involving the largest expenditure of funds ever raised by one effort in this diocese. The duties of the Superintendent's office, which were very burdensome, have been divided, and Mr. M. D. Whisnant of Belhaven, N. C., has been elected to this office. His wife will act as supervising matron. Mr. Wheeler's services, we are happy to announce, will be retained as Chaplain, in which capacity he will minister to the religious life of the children and staff.

FIELDS OF LABOR

In addition to the gains and losses already mentioned, the following changes in the fields of labor have been made:

On April 10, the Reverend Royal G. Shannonhouse gave up the care of St. James' Colored Mission, Pittsboro,

and was succeeded as Priest in Charge on the same day by the Reverend Othello D. Stanley of Durham.

On July 5, I licensed the Reverend Samuel Newman Baxter, Deacon, to officiate in this diocese. He is assisting the Reverend Alfred S. Lawrence in student work at Chapel Hill.

On September 1, the Reverend William Penn Price, Deacon in Charge of Good Shepherd Church, Asheboro, took over the care of Christ Mission, Albemarle.

CHURCH BUILDINGS

Encouragement has been found, during the past year, from several new church buildings that are now in the process of erection.

On September 3, 1939, I laid the corner stone of the Chapel of Thanks at Vade Mecum. This Chapel is one of the diocesan undertakings of the Laymen's League. When completed, it will represent the spirit of gratitude of the men of the Church.

On June 18, 1939, I consecrated under the name of St. Martin's-in-the-Woods a new church building at Knollhurst, near Madison. This is one of several points under the care of the Reverend Harvey A. Cox. It stands surrounded by many graves on the hallowed site of an old log church that has since disappeared. This new structure, with complete furnishings, represents the devoted leadership of Mr. Cox, Mr. Charles R. Wall and the generosity of neighbors in the community and friends in St. Paul's, Winston-Salem.

On July 11th I officiated for the first time in a modest building that serves the purposes of parish house and church, known as St. Mary's by the Roadside, near the town of Leaksville. This structure is due to the initiative and energy of Miss Lillie Hill, our missionary in Rockingham County. She gave the lot on which the building stands, and raised most of the money for its erection. Last fall Miss Hill completed twenty-five years of earnest and self-effacing service as a diocesan missionary. She has been a redemptive force and the human means under God of the rehabilitation of many broken lives.

Last fall, with the permission of the Trustees of the Diocese, the church building at Spring Hope was carefully taken down and removed to Rocky Mount, where it was reassembled on a lot belonging to Holy Hope Mission. This reconstruction has resulted in the duplication of the original building with some improvements. It is now being used for services under the charge of the Reverend Milton M. Weston, who has been ably assisted by a loyal group of laymen, notably Dr. J. Wilton Black.

The fifth new church that we mention with satisfaction and thankfulness is Christ Church, Albemarle, now nearing completion after many years of planning and waiting and sacrificial giving on the part of a small group of devoted people, now under the leadership of the Reverend William Penn Price. The construction of this church, the first in Stanly County, is in line with our missionary policy to plant missions in growing towns, so that the Church may grow up with the place and expand as the population increases.

SUMMARY OF OFFICIAL ACTS

I submit in detail my Journal of Official Acts. During the year, within the diocese, I made 109 visitations, celebrated the Holy Communion 31 times, officiated at 3 Baptisms, 6 weddings, 9 funerals, and took part in 43 other services. I issued 31 Lay Reader's Licenses, attended 52 committee meetings, conferred with 123 individuals or groups, delivered 63 lectures and addresses, and preached 100 times. I confirmed 661 persons, of whom 52 were Negroes and 4 were Deaf. I ordained one Candidate for Holy Orders to the Diaconate, and advanced four Deacons to the Priesthood. I consecrated one church building and laid the cornerstone of another.

Outside the diocese, I celebrated the Holy Communion once, baptized one infant, attended 2 committee meetings, held 12 conferences, and preached on 9 occasions. In November, I attended a meeting of the House of Bishops in St. Louis, and served on the Committee on the Resignation of Bishops.

I must not detain you longer with this formal report, especially since I am privileged to address you again tonight. I would like to comment on many phases of our diocesan life, such as the well considered self-obliteration of St. Peter's Hospital in order to secure for this city the Charlotte Memorial Hospital. I would like to share with you the ambition of St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh, to rehabilitate its present building and to erect a new unit at a total cost of approximately \$125,000. I would enjoy talking to you about the expansion of Vade Mecum and the generosity of the Winston-Salem Foundation towards the development of our summer conference grounds. These and other concerns of our church institutions, I pass over, relying on the reports of the officers to supply you with such information as you may require. I must acknowledge first and last of all the superb leadership of the clergy and the loyal following of their congregations. In their brave attitude towards the almost insuperable problems of our day, we see the church of tomorrow, that by God's help, humbly intends to give a good account of its stewardship.

All recorded cash receipts were traced into the bank accounts of the several funds. Receipts from Endowment and Trust Funds were verified by direct communication with the trustee banks. Payments made by missions and parishes on assessments were not verified beyond the records of the Treasurers.

All disbursements were made by checks and found to have been properly supported.

Cash in bank at December 30, 1939 and January 31, 1940 as shown on Exhibits A, F and G was reconciled with statements rendered by the banks.

EXHIBIT A

This exhibit shows the financial condition of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund at January 31, 1940, December 30, 1939, the date of the death of Mr. Henry M. London, and January 31, 1939.

Intangible Property Tax was charged in error against the bank account by the First Citizens Bank & Trust Co., Raleigh, N. C. This item is shown as "Due from First Citizens Bank & Trust Co." Subsequent to the date of the balance sheet this charge was refunded by the bank.

Assessments Receivable are shown in detail on schedule four. As will be noted these assessments are offset on the liability side of the balance sheet by a reserve. This reserve has been set up for the sole purpose of excluding the uncollected assessments from the surplus account. As assessments are paid they are then taken into income.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESE OF
NORTH CAROLINA

The Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina had four meetings during the year 1939 as follows:—

On May 9, 1939 the Committee met in the Parish House of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, N. C., during the Diocesan Convention, when and where the following action was taken:

At the request of the Bishop, advice of the Committee was given as to the status of one of the Presbyters in the Diocese, and certain recommendations were made to the Bishop at his request.

On May 10, 1939 at the same time and place, the Committee met again and the following action was taken:

Reverend Isaac Wayne Hughes was reelected President of the Committee and Joseph B. Cheshire, Jr. was reelected Secretary.

Mr. Leslie Wilsdon Hewett was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders as of May 10, 1939.

Mr. William Penn Price, a candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate at any time after his graduation from the Virginia Theological Seminary.

The Reverend Gray Temple, a Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood at any time after May 28, 1939.

The Reverend Robert Martin Man, a Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood at any time after May 28, 1939.

The Reverend Louis Aldworth Haskell, a Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood at any time after June 19, 1939.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Arthur Raymond McKinstry, D.D., as Bishop of the Diocese of Delaware.

Consent was given to the election of a Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Chicago, upon request, and in accordance with Canon 15, Section 2.

On September 26, 1939, the Committee met in the office of the Secretary, Joseph B. Cheshire, 206 Raleigh Building & Loan Building, Raleigh, N. C., and the following action was taken:

Mr. Franklyn Heeman Board was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders as of September 15, 1939.

Mr. Edwin Bedford Jeffress, Jr. was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders as of May 22, 1939.

The Reverend Charles Upchurch Harris, Jr., a Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood at any time convenient to the Bishop.

Upon the request of the Bishop, the advice and consent of this Committee was given to allow the Chapel of the Cross at Chapel Hill, N. C., to sell and convey the lot at the back of the Parish

Rectory property, one hundred and six (106) feet front on North Street and one hundred and thirty-five (135) feet deep.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend John James Gravatt, D.D., as Bishop of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Very Reverend Henry Hean Daniels as Bishop of the Diocese of Montana.

Consent was given to the election of a Suffragan Bishop for the Diocese of Connecticut.

The Committee met again on December 20, 1939, at the Wilrik Hotel, Sanford, N. C., and the following action was taken:—

The Bishop of the Diocese presented to the Committee his proposed Schedule of Appropriations of Income for the year 1940 from the Lawrence S. Holt Fund, and the same was approved and the Bishop was authorized to use, in his discretion, any undesignated balance from the said income, provided it is expended under the terms of the said Trust.

Consent was given, at the request of the Presiding Bishop, to (1) The election of a Suffragan Bishop for the Missionary District of Southern Brazil, and (2) the confirmation of election of the Reverend Athalicio Theodoro Pithan, D.D., as Suffragan Bishop of the Missionary District of Brazil.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Howard Rasmus Brinker, as Bishop of the Diocese of Nebraska.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

FOR INFORMATION

Three meetings of the Executive Council were held, in September, January, and April. The Council was organized into departments by the Bishop's appointment as follows:

FINANCE: Messrs. Stephen E. Burroughs, Chairman; Kemp D. Battle, J. Porter Stedman, Arthur H. London, and Kemp P. Lewis.

FIELD AND PUBLICITY: Rev. M. George Henry, Chairman; Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Mr. William T. Anderson.

MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION: Rev. William S. Turner, Chairman; Rev. David W. Yates.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: Rev. John Q. Beckwith, Jr., Chairman; Mrs. W. Johnston King, Mrs. Carl H. Herndon who was formerly Miss Curlena Godfrey, and Mr. George C. Pollard.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS: Rev. John L. Jackson, Chairman; Mr. J. Porter Stedman.

Quotas of parishes and missions to the Church's Program Fund for 1940 were arrived at by securing an average of the following three factors: (1) \$4.50 per communicant for parishes, \$2.50 for organized missions, and \$1.00 for unorganized missions; (2) 50% of current operating expense for 1938; (3) average amount given annually over the last three years to the Church's Program Fund.

Assessments of parishes and missions for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund for 1940 were levied on the basis of 9½% of current operating expense for 1938.

In the Every Member Canvass for this year the parishes and missions pledged toward the Church's Program for 1940 a total of \$47,508.50, against a budget of \$51,583.50, and as compared with quotas assigned of \$57,393.00.

When the Diocese sustained the great loss of Mr. Henry M. London, who had rendered most valuable service as treasurer since 1921, the Bishop appointed as temporary treasurer of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund Mr. J. M. Sink, Jr., of Raleigh.

It was decided that all churches aided by the Diocese would make formal application, preferably in person, for their needs to the Department of Missions. Blanks will be provided to help in doing this.

FOR ACTION

Having been commissioned by the 1939 Diocesan Convention to report to the 1940 Convention on a resolution appearing on page 33 of the 1939 Journal concerning the consolidation of diocesan offices, especially the various treasurerships, into one, the Executive Council offers the following resolutions to this Convention:

1. **RESOLVED:** That the Diocese discontinue the collection of assessments for the Church Pension Fund through its own committee or treasurer, and that all premiums be paid direct to the New York office of the Church Pension Fund by treasurers of parishes and missions and diocesan accounts, effective July 1, 1940, and that Canon XXX, Section 2, Sub-section 4, be amended to conform to this resolution.
2. **RESOLVED:** That the following matter be referred to the Committee on Canons: That Canon XXX further be amended by the addition to Section 2 of Sub-section 7 to read as follows: "To furnish a complete report to the Executive Council through the Finance Department at each regular meeting of the Executive Council."
3. **RESOLVED:** That the 124th Convention express its great appreciation to Mr. Ralph B. Coit of Greensboro, who has rendered the Church invaluable service as treasurer of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund in the Diocese of North Carolina throughout its existence.

4. RESOLVED: That the Security National Bank, Raleigh unit, be elected for one year by the Convention as Treasurer of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund and as Treasurer of the Church's Program Fund, cost of said service to be \$720.00 per annum plus actual cost of postage and stationery (latter estimated at \$125.00).

5. RESOLVED: (a) That an Executive Secretary for the Diocese who may be a clergyman, be appointed by January 1, 1941.

(b) Said appointment to be by the election of the Executive Council, upon the nomination of the Bishop, and whose duties shall be defined by the Executive Council. Said Executive Secretary shall be a coordinating factor in integrating the work of the various departments of the Executive Council, and shall be an ex-officio member of the Council and of each of its departments.

(c) Said Executive Secretary shall be resident in Raleigh and shall establish an office there as his headquarters.

(d) He shall be Editor of the North Carolina Churchman.

(e) Salary shall be \$3,600.00 per annum without residence, Pension Fund \$250.00, office rent and expense allowance \$350.00, travel expense \$600.00. Total expense of Executive Secretary to be \$4,800.00 per annum, and to be included in the Episcopal Maintenance Fund.

(f) Note: in re expense—\$800.00 or better will be saved from expense of Treasurer of Episcopal Maintenance Fund and Treasurer of Church's Program Fund. He could be Secretary of the Diocese and save \$300.00. And an additional \$500.00 would be saved from the North Carolina Churchman, making \$1,600.00 toward the \$4,800.00. Within a year your committee feels the Executive Secretary will save more than the remaining amount in losses and unnecessary expenditures.

6. RESOLVED: That Recommendation No. 3 in the Report of the Special Committee on the Report of the Trustees, page 34 of the Journal of the 1939 Convention, be rescinded.

7. RESOLVED: That all reports of committees at the Diocesan Convention, wherever possible, be submitted by title and only a digest be given by the chairman or secretary.

8. RESOLVED: That a budget for 1941 be adopted as recommended by the Executive Council. The proposed budget will be explained in detail by the chairman of the finance department at the proper time.

REPORT OF THE CHANCELLOR

During the past year there have been very few matters referred to the office of Chancellor.

On November 1, 1939, the question was presented of a Parish, in refinancing its debt on the Parish House, that it would be necessary for the consent of the Bishop to be obtained in executing the mortgage.

Canon 48 of the Canons of the General Convention "of the Consecration of Churches" primarily regulates these matters. However, the Diocesan Canon, No. 48, is broader than that of the General Convention in that it relates to "any property held by it in trust for any Parish or Congregation", while the Canon of the General Convention only relates to "any consecrated church or chapel which has been used solely for divine worship". The Chancellor advised the Bishop that the Diocesan Canon requires his written consent, which must be with the consent and approval of the Standing Committee.

Also, that before giving such consent, it was preferable to have exhibited to him the deed under which the property was held, in order to check up on any probably reverter or non user clause in the deed which might affect adversely the interest of the Church.

January 3, 1940. Advised the Bishop that upon the office of Treasurer of the Diocese becoming vacant by death, that the Ecclesiastical Authority was empowered to fill the vacancy until the regular election, this being provided in the Constitution, Article VII, Section 3.

There were several matters informally discussed with the Bishop, involving largely matters of fact, rather than law, which were orally discussed and not reduced to writing, hence not included in this report.

The opinion of the Chancellor was requested in one or two instances by clergymen concerning a matter with which there was

some disagreement of individual opinion, and in each instance they were advised that under the circumstances it would be improper for an opinion to be expressed.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

Your Committee on the State of the Church respectfully submits the following report:

In this year, which marks the end of a decade, we feel it not inappropriate that a brief, comprehensive study of this period be made with the view to appraising our work and uncovering any trends or developments which might influence the State of the Church at the present time. A compilation of the vital statistics of the diocese for the past ten years presents to us an unusual picture. We have a growing diocese. Gaining 2,641 communicants, we can show an increase of approximately 28% which should compare favorably with any church or any diocese. We are gaining in membership but we are not training our people in the teachings and principles of the Church. Although we have added 2,641 persons to the list of our communicants we have lost 1,205 pupils in our Church Schools. There has been a steady increase in members and a correspondingly steady decrease in Church School pupils. Coupled with this is the fact that 6,224 have been confirmed during the past decade but only 5,010 have been baptized, that is, there has been 1,214 more confirmations than baptisms. Where did these additional candidates come from? The statistics indicate that a very large percentage of them came from other denominations rather

than from persons baptized in other dioceses. And so we are confronted with the fact that our increasing membership is coming from three sources: (1) a diminishing number from our Church Schools, (2) an increasing number from among our own young people who have not received Church training, and (3) from members of other denominations who, presumably, have been trained in their own Church teachings rather than ours. We raise two questions. Does Christian Education contribute to discipleship and so enrich the life of the Church or is a simple profession of faith, followed by the "laying on of hands," sufficient? Does the Protestant Episcopal Church with her doctrine, discipline and worship, peculiar to herself, have a contribution to make as a distinct body of Christians or can she lose her uniqueness without injury to the advancement of the Kingdom of God? These two questions are being answered in the negative every day for the richness of our Churchmanship is being diluted by the above two streams of untrained and uninformed new members. In support of these figures you may be interested to know that in a recent survey made by the Youth Committee of the Department of Christian Education, out of 66 replies from the 124 Parishes and Missions, it was discovered that 25% of our young people between the ages of 12 and 25 are not affiliated with any of our various Church organizations. We would like to interject and emphasize the fact that our decrease in Church School membership is not due to an inadequately manned Church School staff. Although we have lost 1,205 members we have gained 11 officers and teachers. In 1930 there were 6,907 pupils enrolled with only 844 teachers; at the end of 1939 there were but 5,702 pupils with 855 teachers. The Church Schools have increased markedly in staff efficiency and we might add in other ways also. Throughout the diocese there has been no less than a "great awakening" in the field of Christian Education, due in part to strong diocesan leaders and to an exceedingly active Department of Christian Education. Neither can we say that our loss in Church School membership is due to a declining birth-rate. We have had 5,010 baptisms, 6,224 confirmations and have increased our communicants by 2,641 persons.

Before we leave this section of our report, may we say that St. Peter's Church, in which we are meeting today, had the highest number of infant baptisms last year with 52 and that the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, had the greatest number of confirmations with the same number, 52. St. Andrew's Church, Rockingham County, had 56 adult baptisms and 20 confirmations presented by Miss Lillie Hill. Most of these candidates coming from the unlikely environment of a State Prison Camp. There are bright as well as gloomy colors in our Diocesan picture.

Distinctly noticeable in the past few years is the fact that a great deal of realistic thinking and hard work has been going on

among our clerical and lay leaders in an effort to make our work in Christ's name more effective, and a number of practical plans have been evolved. We have mentioned the Department of Christian Education; we would like to refer, with an equal emphasis, to the Department of Missions. That Department is still in the process of making a thorough study of the various mission fields in our diocese, several important recommendations have already been made and others will be forthcoming. The questionnaire being sent out to every aided parish and mission has been thoughtfully prepared and should yield information of vital importance. Then there is the monumental work of the Trustees in insuring all diocesan property under one blanket policy. This represents no less than a pioneering effort so far as our Church is concerned. It has met the difficulties and discouragements of all pioneer undertakings but it is so fundamentally sound that we trust a way will be opened to overcome the obstacles. Already it has proved its worth by the fact that two fires have occurred and insurance collected on them. Then there is the plan, carried into effect last January, to send the North Carolina Churchman into every home in the Diocese. We do not know of any other diocesan policy so potentially fruitful in revitalizing the interest and enthusiasm of the members of our diocesan family in the larger work of our Church than this one. It, too, has met with difficulties. Difficulties so great that, like the above plan, its continuance is endangered seriously.

In looking over the Journals of the Diocese for the past ten years we discover the fact that no missionary clergyman has been elected to the Executive Council, the Standing Committee, as a delegate to the General Convention, nor, with the exception of one, to the Provincial Synod. Of the twenty-two elections to the Executive Council, 18 have been from the larger parishes, 3 from smaller parishes and 1 from a large Church in a college community. Of the Standing Committee, all have been from the larger parishes, the same being true of delegates to the General Convention. Of the laymen, your committee was unable to place all of them but the overwhelming majority was shown to have come from the larger Churches. This means that diocesan policy has been formulated by clergymen and laymen most familiar with the parochial problems of the larger parishes. It is true that practically all of our parochial clergymen are engaged in mission work but there is an enormous difference between such part time and full time work. The above figures are somewhat softened by the fact that some associate members of the various Departments of the Executive Council are, and have been, missionary clergymen and laymen from mission churches but only to an extent and there is another consideration which is not softened by it at all. Lack of an opportunity for leadership tends to engender an attitude of sustained dependence and to discourage initiative. The missionary work of the Church needs to

occupy the foreground of our diocesan picture today. We need to hold those we have and to attract other competent, capable men in this field; to give them full opportunity for expression and to show them, by giving them diocesan positions of responsibility, how great is the call to the missionary enterprise of the Church in the rural areas.

The Negro district of the Layman's League should be commended for its work in promoting the first Negro camp for boys in the diocese. Its name is Camp Delaney and will accommodate 24 boys between the ages of 16 and 21, 3 from each parish and mission. It is planned in conjunction with the Federal Recreational Project, known as the Crabtree Creek development, situated between Raleigh and Durham. This is a start, just as Vade Mecum began, toward a summer camp and conference center for the Negro youth of our diocese. The Department of Christian Education has named Camp Delaney as the objective of that portion of the Diocesan Missionary Church School Offering taken from the Negro churches and has placed an item of \$100.00 in its budget for that purpose. We trust this work will enjoy a rapid growth and expansion. While on the subject of offerings, we would like to ask if one, comparable to the Thompson Orphanage Thanksgiving Offering, could be planned for the negro churches, its proceeds supplementing the \$300.00 now in the budget of the Department of Christian Social Relations?

In conclusion there are two statements on unrelated subjects we would like to make. The first concerns our college work. We would like to remind the Convention that although the Churches in Raleigh and Durham are doing an excellent work at State College and Duke University, nevertheless, there is a real need for full time student workers at these points. The second statement has to do with Church music. We heartily recommend that the delegates to the General Convention endorse the movement to amend and revise the present hymnal so that it will lend itself more readily to congregational singing and to use in the Church Schools.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESE

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

The Trustees of the Diocese respectfully report to the Convention:

1. That the actions taken by the Trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina since their last report are set forth in Exhibit A hereto attached.

2. The account of the Trustees of the Diocese is shown in Ex-

hibit B hereto attached. The principal value of the trust is now listed at the sum of \$59,141.76. Income from the trust for the past year amount to \$2,909.99. Earnings on the trust are 4.604% gross.

3. A detailed audit made by Mr. John Ward, C. P. A., Auditor for the Diocese, will be before the Convention for its consideration, showing an analysis and audit of the accounts of the Trustees.

4. The Trustees again call attention to the situation caused by the non-payment of insurance premiums by missions using property incurred by the Trustees. The amount necessary to be paid by missions, while extremely small for the current year, has not been paid by these missions and the trustees have been compelled to borrow money to keep the insurance in force.

5. While several attempts have been made to secure proper arbitrators to hear and decide the questions raised with reference to the funds of the Ladies Aid Society of Kittrell, the Bishop has been unable to secure anyone willing to serve in this matter and nothing looking towards a settlement of the controversy has been accomplished during the past year.

6. A report of the condition of the Francis J. Murdoch Memorial Society for the propagation of the Ministry is hereto attached for the consideration of the Convention. In that trust, the N. L. Coiner note is secured by second mortgage which was delivered to the Trustees with the other assets of the trust. The mortgage is, however, being liquidated as rapidly as possible.

7. The Trustees have received the sum of \$1461.31 in cash and Deed to a house and lot on Halifax Street, Raleigh, from the North Carolina Diocesan Girls' Friendly Society of America, Incorporated, to be added to and held as a part of the Bishop's Discretionary Fund. Of this amount \$450.00 was specified to be paid for a Girls' Friendly cabin at Vade Mecum.

8. In August of 1939, the Trustees requested Mr. J. C. M. Vann of Monroe to bring suit to test the validity of the trusts established by the will of General William A. Smith. Sometime thereafter Mr. Vann was called to Washington on some public employment and requested that he be relieved. Messrs. Taliaferro and Clarkson of Charlotte were then employed and suit for this purpose has been begun.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

As president, it becomes my duty to make to this Convention a report of the Auxiliary in our diocese for the year between May 1939 and May 1940.

First, let me thank you for considering our work an integral part of the program of the diocese and for giving us representation on its Executive Council. All dioceses do not grant this to the women.

A leader always likes to report progress in an organization; I am happy to call your attention to certain indications of advance in the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese. Our numbers have increased principally by organization of chapters of business women's groups who hold their meetings in the evening. This is a real source of strength to us. We have a branch, recently organized, in a town that has no parish church. Some formerly inactive groups report aroused interest. If generosity is any indication, we are in a healthful condition. Having had a substantial balance in our treasury for the past few years, we passed a resolution at the annual meeting to increase the amount of the budget for 1941. Out of our balance of 1939 we contributed the amount necessary to erect a cabin at Vade Mecum, made contributions to the Refugee Fund and to the Fund for Retiring Deaconesses, gave an amount to the Young People's Service League to provide a Progress Award Banner and to help defray expenses of their Conference for Counselors and Presidents. Over and above our pledges for this year, a special contribution is being made in recognition of the splendid work of Dr. Lula Dissoway at St. Elizabeth Hospital, Shanghai, China.

Reports show that a more informed program is being carried out and that our women are availing themselves of the wonderful opportunities given by the literature sent out through Church Missions House, New York, and the Forward Movement Commission.

In the department of Christian Social Relations there is evident a decided forward looking grasp of the meaning of that program.

During the year we have had two of the provincial officers in our diocese, both of whom brought stimulating messages and vigorous suggestions to our women.

We desire to work with you, not as a separate organization, but as a unit in the whole program of the Church. To this end, we ask the Clergy to make possible Parish Councils. And we hereby tender to this body whatever we have that can be used in co-operation with you, as leaders, for the advancement of the Kingdom of God.

REPORT OF THE LAYMEN'S LEAGUE

Claims of progress in the growth and accomplishments of the Laymen's Leagues throughout the Diocese this past year seem to be amply justified after a careful review of the activities of the various Parish Leagues.

At the Annual Diocesan Conference held at Vade Mecum September 2nd and 3rd, 1939, a change in personnel of the Diocesan League was brought about by the Annual election with the following results: President, H. C. Worrall; Vice-President, Lawrence E. Watt; Secretary, J. Louis Williamson; Treasurer, Henry London Anderson. The fact that the officers chosen are all from Charlotte affords convenience for frequent conferences between regular called executive sessions.

As to statistics: Throughout the Diocese there are at present 32 Parish Leagues chartered and several that have not as yet received their Charters. In addition, a number of Men's Organizations performing practically similar work in their respective Parishes are awaiting due commitment into active Leagues. It is estimated that some 1500 men throughout the Diocese are actively engaged in their respective Parish interests.

As to Activities: Among the accomplishments of the past year are:

26 boys enjoyed the beneficent privileges and moral uplift of a week's vacation at Camp Tise, Vade Mecum.

The building of three cottages at Vade Mecum, now in progress, with promises and assurances of further activity in this direction.

Material assistance rendered Miss Maud Cutter in the conducting of Vacation Bible Schools.

Supplying of Play Ground Instructor at the Thompson Orphanage through Summer Season, 1939.

Distribution of gifts to the Children of the Baby Cottage at the Thompson Orphanage Christmas, 1939.

Sponsoring the building of a Chapel at Vade Mecum to be known as The Chapel of Thanks. As the name indicates, this Chapel is to be erected by voluntary Thank Offerings. The work has progressed to the extent of the laying of the Corner Stone. This was done by our Bishop September 3, 1939. This worthy project is under the direction of Hobart Steele, Burlington.

Many individual projects within the various leagues, local matters, prevail quite generally. Other activities comprise personal contacts—visitations to meetings of Parish Leagues, supplemented by several meetings of the officers reviewing accomplishments and activities of various Chapters.

Reviewing exchange correspondence with leagues of other dioceses. Especially interesting was that of the Diocese of Tennessee.

Official visitations made to both semi-annual sessions of the District Meetings comprising the combined Leagues of the Negro Churches held in October, 1939 at St. Michael's Church, Charlotte, and in March, 1940, at St. Augustine's, Raleigh. The district comprises nine chartered Leagues, with meetings well attended and worthy projects established. I desire to particularly emphasize the grand work of the establishment of a summer camp for Negro boys at Raleigh. This camp honors the name of the late Rt. Rev. Henry Beard Delany, Suffragan Bishop, 1918-1928. The official opening of Camp Delany will be July 8, 1940. Dr. Edson E. Blackman, Charlotte, is the motive power behind this movement, and too much praise cannot be given him and his army of associates for their splendid work being carried on and the spirit upholding it.

The officers of the Diocesan League are most desirous of rendering every assistance possible, to the end of stimulating interest in established Leagues and assisting in the establishment of new Leagues, with a view and in the hope that every man will be sufficiently aroused to consider it a privilege to do his part in his Church's work.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF SAINT MARY'S SCHOOL, INCORPORATED

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of incorporation the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith the report of this Board for the Academic year 1939-40.

Since the Diocesan Convention of 1939 the following important meetings of the Governing Boards of Saint Mary's have been held:

May 30, 1939, Semi-Annual Meeting Board of Trustees.

July 11, 1939, Building Committee.

October 4, 1939, Executive Committee.

April 2, 1940, Executive Committee.

Since my last report the following new members have been welcomed to membership on the Board of Trustees: The Rt. Rev. John J. Gravatt, Bishop of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina, and the Rev. W. M. Latta of Windsor, N. C., representative from the Diocese of East Carolina. The Board has lost through death one member: The Rev. Geo. S. Gresham of Goldsboro, representative of the Diocese of East Carolina.

Important matters that have been considered in these meetings include: Approval of the completion of the Library Extension program which included the relocation of class rooms in West Wing,

a new choir robing room, new locker and assembly room for Day Students, an added studio to the Music Building, an apartment for the Dietitian, the erection of a storage warehouse; discussion of plans for the 1942 Centennial; continuation of road and walks improvements and Campus landscaping as funds allow; expression of appreciation to the Saint Mary's Alumnae Association for re-decoration and extensive improvements in the Smedes Parlor; discussion of safety first installations, including sprinkler system. Consideration of: retirement fund for teachers, full time Alumnae Secretary; and approval of the new recreation building, largely financed by donations from Students and Faculty.

The present 1939-40 school session has been most satisfactory from all viewpoints. We have a capacity registration of 221 resident students and in addition 61 Day and Special Students. The geographical registration is about the same as in recent years, with 21 States represented: 123 resident students from North Carolina, 40 from Virginia and 13 from South Carolina, 7 from Florida.

Of our total enrollment, Resident and Day Students, the religious denominations represented are: Episcopal 151, Methodist 52, Presbyterian 31, Baptist 26, Christian 7, other denominations 9.

A great loss occurred in our Faculty on February 23rd through the passing of Mr. Wm. H. Jones, Head of our Music Department, who had been at Saint Mary's since 1919 and was greatly beloved by both Faculty and Students because of his ability and friendly disposition.

As this report is written we have accepted for our coming session, which opens in mid-September, 172 applications of returning and new students, which indicates another capacity enrollment. Of this number 107 are returning students.

A condensed financial statement of Assets and Liabilities of Trustees funds from the Auditor's report for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1940, is attached.

This report would be incomplete without an expression of grateful appreciation on the part of the Trustees for the highly efficient manner in which Saint Mary's has been operated during the past year in all of its departments.

REPORT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE

The Orphanage cared for 103 children during the year 1939. Of this number, 19 were placed—2 at College, 2 in Business College, 5 in good jobs, 9 with relatives, and one in a private home. There are 84 in the Orphanage at present; 8 of these hope to graduate in June. 1 is preparing to enter College, 3 wish to go to Business Schools, and 4 wish to take the Nurses Training Course.

The school record of the children has been good and in some cases excellent with boys and girls making the National Honor Society. Each year more children qualify for higher education, at College or business schools.

This past year for the first time in the history of the Institution we have a graduate from Chapel Hill, beginning Medical College and another boy making a splendid record as a teacher in

High School. This is very encouraging. Ten years ago there were perhaps half a dozen in High School. Today we have more than a score.

Ten years ago there was little or no participation in extra curricular activities, today many hold class offices and are carrying off honors on the athletic field and in social affairs as well as scholastically. The children enter fully in all the school events, dances, football and basketball games and have many friends outside the institution.

The health of the children, as usual, has been remarkably good, with the exception of a slight outbreak of Influenza in December.

In the late summer a thorough study of the policies and practice of the Orphanage was made by trained experts and many valuable suggestions made for the betterment of the work.

In June Mr. Manly D. Whisnant is coming to take over the work as Superintendent, with Mrs. Whisnant as Supervising Matron and a Case Worker. With these splendid additions to the Staff much better service can be rendered to the children committed to our care.

It should be borne in mind, however, that with this forward looking program, an increased income will be needed, and if possible the amount budgeted to the Orphanage from the Diocese should be raised.

For the generous Thanksgiving offering of last November, the Board of Managers and the Executive Committee would express most grateful appreciation, and for the fine help of the Women's Co-operative Committee.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH

Two years ago Sewanee was in a very bad condition. The enrollment was low. The University was operating at an annual deficit of \$35,000.00. The Vice-Chancellor, the executive head who corresponds to the president of other institutions, had resigned and was continuing on for a year because no one could be secured to take his place.

Then came a turning point in Sewanee's history. Dr. Alexander Guerry resigned as President of the University of Chattanooga, which he had built up, and renounced a bright future in order to cast in his lot with Sewanee and, as I believe, dedicate his life to the development of the University and the service of the Church there-

by. Since that time the enrollment has increased in the University from 216 to 287, in the Theological School from 16 to 25, and in the Academy from 119 to 192. The University now has a capacity enrollment. Financially, a campaign was successfully conducted by Dr. Guerry in which \$100,000 a year for five years, a total of \$500,000, was pledged to a Sewanee Sustaining Fund. This was to enable Sewanee to operate without a deficit and on a secure fiscal basis for five years and to reduce a floating indebtedness of \$160,000 that had accumulated. During that period it is Dr. Guerry's purpose to secure enough endowment to give the University permanent stability in the future. In the fiscal year ending Aug. 31, 1939, there was no deficit and the University reduced its floating indebtedness by \$55,000. The buildings have been thoroughly renovated and the grounds greatly improved, so that the University has one of the finest plants in the entire country. The village has been largely remade as well.

The next step is for the southern dioceses of the Episcopal Church, that own Sewanee, to assume the responsibility for her support. This has never been done, which explains the deplorable condition into which the school had gotten. Consequently an item has been placed in the 1941 budget for the Church's Program in the Diocese of North Carolina amounting to \$2,000, which is, as nearly as can be figured, our share of the University's support. This is an important obligation of ours.

There is one other thing that we should all do for Sewanee, and thereby do for our sons and for our Church. It is to send our sons to Sewanee. If we be loyal Episcopalians, our own University makes a stronger appeal than any other institution, and provides a greater opportunity for the education of our youth, because it gives splendid academic preparation under the auspices of the Church and with the rare combination of education and Christianity.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S SERVICE LEAGUE

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

The Young People's Service League in the Diocese of North Carolina according to the census taken by the Youth Committee, supplemented by records of the league, has an unofficial membership of six hundred and fifty young people. This group represents approximately one fourth of the young people in the diocese reported between the ages of twelve and twenty-five. Since the league age begins at fourteen usually and takes in very few over nineteen this shows that the Service League is reaching a very large percentage of the young people in the diocese.

The YPSL has had a very successful year. For the first time in years the amount paid to the Bishop's Scholarship Fund has gone over four hundred dollars. The YPSL in the Diocese raised well over six hundred dollars for the Vade Mecum Cabin Fund, more than four hundred being raised by one league in Henderson. As in former years we sent four hundred and fifty presents at Christmas time to the missions around Sewanee. The Young People's Thank Offering presented last year at the convention at Sewanee was the largest ever presented by one diocese, amounting to over one hundred and fifty dollars. At this time it seems that we will approach this figure again this year. Our progress has not all been in dollars and cents. The most encouraging feature of the year's work is the fact that the number of really active leagues is larger than at any time during recent years. This feature is present in small missions as well as in the larger parishes, and the enthusiasm seems to be spreading to the church as a whole. This is especially true in the smaller missions, one of our most promising leagues being in a place where there is not even a church building at the present time.

In many churches closer contact between the League, the Woman's Auxiliary, clergy, and laymen has meant not only revival in the Service League but also renewed enthusiasm in the whole parish. The Service League has been greatly indebted to the Woman's Auxiliary, including the diocesan organization, parochial branches, and individuals. Increased enthusiasm in many of the larger parishes is directly due to the inter-working of the Auxiliary and the YPSL.

The Young People's Service League in the Diocese of North Carolina is looking to the future. We have made mistakes in the past in the midst of our successes. Yet the YPSL of 1940 contains your rectors, Woman's Auxiliary presidents, vestries, and congregations of the 1950's. It is up to the Church in the diocese to realize this fact and assume a definite responsibility. The Diocesan YPSL in North Carolina gives thanks for our Bishop and church leaders as North Carolina leads the way again in the Province of Sewanee in providing for her young people. This summer at our diocesan camp at Vade Mecum there will be a conference for YPSL counselors and league presidents from each league in the diocese running from September first through the sixth. Thanks to a grant from the Diocesan Department of Christian Education this conference will be open to these two representatives from each league in the diocese free of charge. Courses on YPSL work will be taught by recognized leaders including the Rev. Frederick H. Arterton, National Youth Secretary, from New York City. It is the definite responsibility of each rector and leader from each church in the diocese to see that their young people are represented at this conference.

The YPSL is still looking to the future. We are looking to the

time when we will have a full time Young People's Service League worker in this diocese. We realize this is a new thing in this province. Other dioceses do not have them. But when did North Carolina wait for an example in progress in young people's work? Six hundred and fifty young Episcopalians growing up in the Diocese of North Carolina need more attention than rectors can give them; they need more than nine young people on the Diocesan Executive Committee can give them; they need more than their early years in the Sunday School can give them. They need the Service League, and a Service League with an established leader to help them to "know the Christ, and to Make Him Known."

REPORT OF ST. AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE

(including St. Agnes' Hospital and the Bishop Tuttle School)

During the past year 313 students have been enrolled in the Institution. Of this number 244 have been taking the regular college course, an increase of about eight per cent over the college enrollment of the previous year. The students come from 24 states and from foreign countries. About fifty per cent come from North Carolina, about twenty-five per cent from other states of the South and the remainder from other parts of the United States and from foreign countries. The largest representation in the State of North Carolina is naturally from Raleigh. Winston-Salem, Edenton and Wilmington have large delegations. About fifty per cent of the students are Communicants of our Church. Many of them are children of our Clergy. Active Church work is carried on both on the campus and in the community. The Woman's Auxiliary, both Senior and Junior branches, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, The Laymen's League and Altar Guild are among the Church organizations that are functioning effectively. Each year the Bishop confirms a class of from ten to twenty members. Groups of students are helpful in holding services at St. Agnes' Hospital, in the neighborhood and in the County Home and Prison Camps. Representatives have attended meetings in Greensboro and Chapel Hill as well as interracial gatherings of young people in Raleigh. The College Chapel Lenten Offering was about \$350.00.

A number of important conferences have been held on the campus during the past year. These included the well attended district meeting of the Laymen's League, the State Public Welfare Institute for Negro Workers, the annual meeting of the Crown and Scepter Honorary Scholarship Society which has its headquarters at St. Augustine's and a conference called in the interest of promot-

ing the training of workers in mental hygiene. There will also be the usual St. Augustine's Conference for Negro Clergy and Church Workers which includes a well conducted conference for young people.

Our academic work has been strengthened through an arrangement for interchange of students in certain courses with Shaw University and also by the establishment through the aid of the General Education Board, of a joint professorship of English at the two institutions. Through the efforts of Rev. Dr. Patton of the American Church Institute for Negroes, English prizes aggregating \$100 in value are being offered this year. In the near future it is expected that two prize scholarships covering charges for tuition will be established in memory of the late Bishop Henry B. Delany by members of his family. This will be a welcome form of aid as the college receives numerous appeals for aid in behalf of promising and needy students.

ST. AGNES' HOSPITAL

During the past year St. Agnes' Hospital with its Training School or about 35 pupil nurses continued its helpful work of healing and education. From May 1, 1939 to May 1, 1940 there were 25,787 Hospital days, 1,531 bed patients, 1,923 clinic patients, 3,613 out patient visits, 1,111 operations. The State Commission for the Blind continues to supervise clinics and to enter patients for observation and treatment. Work with children is similarly fostered by the State Division for Crippled Children. An important feature of the work during the past year has been the employment of a trained social worker, a graduate of the Bishop Tuttle School, to work among the patients while in the hospital and to do follow up work after they leave. Contacts are made with various community agencies that often result in permanent benefit for the discharged patients. A Hospital Auxiliary has been organized and is proving itself useful. Plans have been made for the observance of National Hospital Day on May 12th.

The physical plant of the hospital is desperately in need of complete reconditioning and remodelling as well as of additional and modern facilities, if it is to continue to operate with any degree of effectiveness. Plans are being formulated to remedy this situation by an appeal to the Church and to other sources for substantial gifts. St. Agnes has had a splendid record in her ministry of healing and of education for health and human welfare. We feel confident that ways and means will be found to continue this good work.

THE BISHOP TUTTLE SCHOOL

This school for Religious Education and Social Work was established and is maintained chiefly through the interest and help of the National Woman's Auxiliary. Since its founding in 1925 about sixty graduates have gone out to undertake work in Church fields or in the more general field of Social Service. A national field worker for the Auxiliary was trained at the school and when she withdraws from the work in July another graduate will take her place. Special emphasis is being placed on training for religious education, a field in which there is a marked scarcity of qualified workers. Connected with the work of the school is the Tuttle Community Center, a remarkably active and effective institution which has won such public approval that it receives substantial help each year from the Community Chest.

In conclusion I would urge that serious consideration be given to the matter of securing more aid for the work of St. Augustine's College and its affiliates from the Dioceses in the State of North Carolina from which come the bulk of its students. St. Augustine's was founded at the instigation of Bishop Atkinson of North Carolina. All but one of the original incorporators were Churchmen of the Diocese. Today three-fourths of the Trustees are North Carolinians. From time to time there is criticism at National Headquarters because North Carolina seems to do so little for St. Augustine's in comparison with what is done for other institutions for the Negro by the Dioceses in which they are located. A beginning has been made toward removing grounds for this criticism. We hope that as time goes on increased support from North Carolina will cause such criticism to cease entirely.

ANNUAL REPORT OF VADE MECUM CAMPS AND CONFERENCES
TO THE DIOCESAN CONVENTION

The 1939 Schedule—

The Diocesan Camp and Conference program started on June 9th and ended on September 3rd in 1939. There were five Camps and six conferences, each of which was led by a competent director, heading a staff of qualified and experienced counselors and teachers. The schedule included the following: Young People's Service League Convention, College Girls Conference, Daily Vacation Bible Training Institute, Camp Cheshire Senior, Camp Cheshire Junior, Camp Penick Senior, the Woman's Auxiliary Conference, Camp Tise, Camp Penick Junior, the School of Teacher Training, and the Laymen's

League Convention. This schedule offered a place for everyone in the Church over ten years of age.

Other Conferences held at Vade Mecum last year included the Home Demonstration Recreational Conference of the Northwest District, and the Northwest District Welfare Conference, and also a Young People's Service League District Meeting.

Personnel and Management—

Every effort was made to secure the best leaders available for the different camps and conferences. The faculty for each conference were selected on the basis of their ability and training in the topic for their course. Even the counselors were chosen on the basis of their ability and experience in specializing in one or more phases of the camp program. The permanent staff consisted of the Business Manager, Office Secretary, Registered Nurse, Dietitian, three cooks, and four camp assistants who served as truck drivers, night-watchmen, and general handymen. This staff was supplemented from time to time by waitresses for the adult conferences, and by a part time secretary before camp opened. Living on the farm is a full time caretaker, and two tenants.

The Vade Mecum Committee—

At the September 29th meeting, the committee gave final approval to the Cabin Building program, accepted the plans for the Chapel of Thanks, ordered the annual examination of the Treasurer's books by the Chairman of the Department of Finance, adopted a tentative schedule for 1940, appointed two camp curriculum committees, and authorized improvements to the Vade Mecum property to be made at the discretion of the Business Manager and Mr. Mackie in consultation with representatives of the Winston-Salem Foundation.

The Curriculum committees outlined courses for two years for the Camps, and ordered the presentation of certificate awards for the completion of courses, which are to be signed by the chairman of the Department of Christian Education of the Diocese.

Scholarships—

Since Vade Mecum operates at cost, it cannot offer free expenses to members of camps or conferences. Those expenses must be paid, for everyone who registers. Some of the boys and girls and some of the adults who attend, and others who want to attend Vade Mecum cannot pay all of their expenses. This is especially true of the missions. Therefore, I urge each Church (Parish and Mission) to establish a Scholarship Fund to send your boys and girls to camp, and your Church School leaders to the conferences. Such a Fund might be made a part of the regular Budget of the Parish.

Vade Mecum must never go into debt. This can be accomplished only with the full cooperation of every clergyman and every Church in the Diocese.

Cabin Building Fund—

Since January 1st, when the balance in the Cabin Building Fund was only \$118.53, sufficient funds (\$2,626.29) have come in from various Church organizations, special offerings, and individual contributions to complete the erection of six more cabins, in addition to the one already erected, each fully equipped with lights and water. These cabins have been erected and named as follows: The Laymen's League Cabin, The Women's Auxiliary Cabin, The Girls' Friendly Cabin, the Young People's Service League Cabin, St. Peter's, Charlotte Cabin, Holy Innocents, Henderson Cabin, and the Durham-Chapel Hill Cabin. All of them will be ready for occupancy on June first. There is a possibility that two more cabins will be erected in addition to these sometime this month.

REPORT OF COLLEGE WORK

The year 1939 has brought several changes in the personnel of our college workers. Miss Margaret Fletcher came to the Woman's College at Greensboro last September, and has proved herself an able successor to Miss Margaret Williams. The Rev. Henry Nutt Parsley is assisting Mr. Yates at Duke, and the Rev. Samuel N. Baxter came last July as assistant for student work at Chapel Hill.

By the very nature of college work, it is impossible to point out much in the way of immediate results. But all our colleges report good attendance at Church services, and considerable interest in religious problems and in Church affairs.

Two worth while conferences have been held during the year; a diocesan student conference held at St. Mary's House in November, at which a dozen colleges were represented; and a provincial student conference in Tallahassee just after Christmas. At this conference we had one of the largest delegations. The college workers, along with college workers of other churches in the state, also met at St. Mary's House in February, for a conference with Dr. Shedd of the Yale Divinity School.

I am happy to report that the work at Chapel Hill has received a small grant from the Church Society for College Work, to make it possible to retain Mr. Baxter for another year.

REPORT OF THE DEAF MISSION IN THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

Herewith is a summary of my work in the Diocese for the year ending May 7, 1940.

I have delivered 183 sermons and addresses. I have baptized four infants and two adults; have performed one marriage and officiated two funerals.

I have presented eight candidates for Confirmation; four of whom were in St. Paul's Church, Winston-Salem and four in St. Andrew's Church, Greensboro.

Outside of Ephphatha parish I have preached to more than fifteen hundred people and ministered to them in other ways. Besides our religious services, we have our social gatherings in the parish houses. Our people are happy and contented, and all are satisfied that the Churches have brought so much joy and blessing into their lives.

I have two licensed Lay Readers in Winston-Salem. They conduct services every week in St. Paul's parish. I am going to have more Lay Readers very soon for the other Stations where I hold services.

A Home was founded in the year 1885 by the late Rev. Thomas Gallaudet, D.D. It is admirably situated in the center of a fine farm of one hundred acres, extending from the turnpike between New Hamburg and Poughkeepsie, to the bank of the Hudson River. The object of this Home should be borne in mind by all who desire that the infirm deaf should be made as happy as may be consistent with their great deprivation. It is a charity that appeals to the generous sympathy of all Christian people.

Mr. Gallaudet was the first missionary to the Deaf in our country.

A Home was donated to the Deaf of the Southern States in the year 1931. It is located at Moultrie, just seven miles from St. Augustine, Florida. There are nine homeless inmates in the Home. It is a home in every sense, comfortable, cozy and airy. It is named The Dixie Home for the Aged and Infirm Deaf. It is governed by a board of trustees. I am chairman of the Board of Trustees.

Where I have met our clergy in the fields which I have visited, they have been cordial and helpful. For this, I am very grateful. The deaf people in our State appreciate deeply the opportunities which the Episcopal Church has opened up to them. We thank you all.

4. We ask the Department of Christian Education of our Diocese to establish study courses in Church schools on this subject and use every means available to inform our people of this great movement.

5. We desire the Convention to continue the Commission on Faith and Order for further study of Church unity.

Your Commission has held two meetings in the past year. Both were held in St. Peter's Church, Charlotte. The Commission has been in close touch with the Joint Commission on Approaches to Unity of the General Church. A member of the Commission with our Bishop represented the Diocese at the North Carolina Council of Churches.

We offer the following resolution:

Resolved, that this Convention reaffirm its faith in the eternal values of Christianity as opposed to those forces which wish to challenge it.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ARREARAGES OF CHURCH PENSION FUND

To the Diocese of North Carolina:

Your Committee on Arrearages of the Church Pension Fund, continued over from the Diocesan Convention of 1939, beg to report that they have assiduously worked at the collection of the unpaid Arrearages and regret to report such meager results.

When the work was commenced—about February 1939—there were 72 Pension years (unpaid or partly unpaid premiums) of Arrearages as of December 31, 1937. Today after adding in the Arrearages for the year ending December 31, 1938 we find that there are 65 Pension years in arrearage aggregating \$1,659.49. Of the unpaid Arrearages there are 14 Church Pension years aggregating \$159.23 owed on three White Clergymen, and 51 Clergy years aggregating \$1,499.61 owed on eight Negro Clergymen, a total of \$1,659.54. This is exclusive of \$735.23 interest of which \$34.40 is owed on White Clergymen and \$700.83 owed on Negro Clergymen, a total of \$735.23.

Your Committee has information as to the attained age of seven of the Clergymen on whom the Parishes and Missions are delinquent (as to the other five, we have not the age of birth) and these work out age 53 as an average. One is 63, one is 62, one is 60, one is 55, and another is 50. As the clergyman approaches retirement at age 68, or as he faces the possibility of disease or injury disabling him, the amount of arrearage of the Church Pension Fund becomes a serious matter.

We think the Diocese should take steps (1) to collect up from the Parishes and Missions in arrears the amount due, (2) to clean out the amount charged against the Convocation of Colored People, and (3) that the Committee be discharged.

REPORT OF THE LAY TRUSTEE OF KANUGA
 TO THE CONVENTION, DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

Kanuga operated under two very heavy handicaps last summer. The first was the absence of its former head and mainspring, the late Bishop Finlay, which not only removed the chief figure in the supervisory staff but no doubt tended to reduce the attendance. The second handicap was the prevalence of "polio" over a large part of the region upon which Kanuga depends for its patronage. The situation was so serious in the Diocese of South Carolina that no children would be accepted by Kanuga from a number of counties. The risk of contagion no doubt kept many others away.

The net result was a deficit of some \$2,850 for the year's operation. Had receipts been the same as in the previous year for the Junior Conference and the Young People's Service League, this deficit would have been converted to a profit of nearly \$2,000, which would have been a good working balance.

The regular summer meeting of the Board of Managers met at Kanuga July 25. All representatives from this Diocese appointed by Bishop Penick were present. These are: one presbyter, Rev. James McD. Dick; one layman, who is also the Trustee; the president of the Woman's Auxiliary; and the president of the Young People's Service League. The progress of work on the chapel received chief consideration. The offer by a South Carolina churchman to build a classroom under the chapel was accepted with gratitude.

On January 19, 1940, the annual meeting of the Board of Managers of Kanuga Conference was held in Columbia, South Carolina. Rev. J. McD. Dick and William Gordon, Jr., represented this diocese. Your Trustee was detained at home on account of sickness. Bishop Penick and the president of the Woman's Auxiliary were also unable to attend. In view of the deficit for the year's operation, as noted above, the Board of Managers authorized the borrowing of \$2,500 for contemplated necessary expenses. It also approved the employment of a new farm manager, a graduate of State College. Rev. Rufus Morgan notified the Board that it would be necessary for him to resign as Manager, as his parish needed more of his time. He agreed, however, to carry on until the summer meeting.

Mr. Morgan reported for the Kanuga Chapel Building Committee. A total of \$10,695 had been received and all but \$380 of that had been expended. It was estimated that it would take about \$1,800 to complete the building, so the committee was authorized to borrow \$1,500 with the understanding that the Rev. J. L. Jackson would put on a campaign to raise that amount.

It was decided to lay the corner stone on the occasion of the first conference and to have the chapel consecrated the first Sunday of the adult conference, which will be July 14.

In a letter recently received from Mr. Morgan he says that "the prospects for the summer are very good indeed." Miss Loma Squires, who has built up a splendid reputation at Queen's College, Charlotte, has been engaged as dietitian for the summer.

As in former years, Bishop Jackson is to be in charge of the conferences assisted by Rev. Mr. Pinckney.

The one Diocesan Presentation Service held in the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, was again a great success.

REPORT FOR GOOD SAMARITAN HOSPITAL FOR 1939

Another year has been added to the half-century of service rendered by the Good Samaritan Hospital to the colored people of Charlotte, and it is with a feeling of gratitude for this privilege of serving that the hospital reports the completion of a most successful year.

Definite improvement has been made in the Training School, and we now have a trained instructress who devotes her entire time to teaching.

During the year, work was begun on a new dining room, classroom and laboratory in the unfinished basement of the Maternity Wing, which, when completed, will add to the comfort and efficiency of the training school.

Through the efforts of Dr. W. Z. Bradford, funds were obtained whereby we were able to send one of our supervisors to the Chicago Lying-In-Hospital for a three months post-graduate course in obstetrical nursing. Thus, with a specially trained supervisor in charge, we feel that the standard of the maternity work of the hospital has been elevated.

The hospital could not have carried on without the help and support of its friends, and we wish to express our sincere appreciation especially to St. Peter's Church and the Duke Endowment for their generous gifts.

Journal of Proceedings

FIRST DAY

Burlington, N. C., May 6, 1941

The one hundred and twenty-fifth annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina was held in the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, beginning May 6.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 a.m. with the Bishop as Celebrant, assisted by the Rev. James S. Cox.

At 9:30 a.m. Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. James S. Cox and the Bishop.

At 10:00 a.m. the Bishop called the Convention to order. The Secretary called the roll. A quorum in both orders being found present the Bishop declared the Convention duly organized. On nomination the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence was elected Secretary. He appointed the Rev. Daniel W. Allen as his assistant.

The Rev. James S. Cox then welcomed the Convention to the Parish and moved that the printed program be adopted as the schedule of the Convention. With a slight change in the time of the afternoon session the schedule was adopted.

The Bishop then appointed as a Committee on Credentials: the Rev. J. M. Dick, Mr. C. G. Harrison, Mr. R. Boulogny.

The Bishop noted the presence in the Convention of the Rev. Ernest Arnold, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Council of Churches. At the invitation of the Bishop Mr. Arnold spoke briefly.

On motion the Rev. S. N. Baxter, Jr., and the Rev. J. L. Martin were granted seats in the Convention.

The Bishop then called the Rev. I. W. Hughes to the chair and delivered his annual address. (See Appendix A.)

The Bishop resumed the chair and appointed as a Committee on New Parishes the Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, the Rev. L. F. Kent, Mr. Hal A. London, Mr. George Long, Mr. I. H. Huske. The application from St. Paul's, Monroe, was referred to this committee.

The Report of the Standing Committee was read by Mr. Joseph B. Cheshire. (Page 110.)

The Report of the Executive Council was presented by the Rev. D. W. Yates. (Page 111.)

Mr. K. P. Lewis reported on the Aid to British Missions. (Page 112.)

As a supplement to the Report of the Executive Council, Mr. S. E. Burroughs presented the financial budget for 1942. After discussion the budget on Episcopal Maintenance was adopted. (Page 113.) The budget for the Church's Program was then introduced. The Rev. J. A. Wright offered the following resolution:

That it is the sense of this Convention that the budget should not exceed by more than four thousand dollars the present Operating Fund, and that a committee of five be appointed to restudy the budget and to report back to the Convention.

After much discussion this resolution was lost. An amendment to the budget was offered by the Rev. J. M. Dick to add a hundred dollars for a State College Entertainment Fund. Motion was carried. On motion of the Rev. W. G. Clark, D.D., the vote on the budget was made the special order for the opening of the afternoon session.

The Rev. W. S. Turner moved that a committee of three be appointed to consider the items in the Bishop's address and to report back to the Convention. Carried.

Nominations were then made as in the Rules of Order.

At 1:00 p.m. the Convention took a recess for lunch.

At 2:15 the Convention reconvened. The special order, the vote on the budget, was called for. The budget as amended by the addition of a hundred dollars was after further discussion adopted. (Page 114.)

The Rev. E. B. Guerry offered a resolution dealing with the procedure of assigning quotas. On motion this was referred to the Department of Finance to report back at its earliest convenience.

The Rev. J. Q. Beckwith reported for the Committee on New Parishes as follows:

The Committee on New Parishes respectfully reports that we recommend unanimously the admission of St. Paul's Church, Monroe, into the Diocese as a Parish. We have examined the credentials and

find everything in order and are convinced that this congregation is able to maintain its status as a Parish.

The report was adopted and the delegates from St. Paul's, Monroe, took their seats in the Convention.

Invitations for the next Convention to meet in Chapel Hill and in Salisbury were extended by Col. J. H. Pratt and Mr. James McKenzie. As a committee to decide the place of the next meeting the Bishop appointed the Rev. W. J. Gordon, Mr. Cleveland Thayer, and Dr. M. S. Brown.

The Report of the Trustees was read by Mr. Joseph B. Cheshire. (Page 116.) It was referred to a special committee consisting of Mr. T. W. Mullen, Mr. Kemp Yarborough, Mr. A. H. London.

The Bishop then appointed as the committee on the Bishop's address the Rev. T. A. Cheatham, Rev. J. S. Cox, Mr. H. C. Bird; as a committee to advise with the Trustees concerning the Smith Fund,—Mr. K. D. Battle, Mr. L. A. Watt, Mr. H. H. Hardison, Mr. J. H. Cutter.

Mr Alexander B. Andrews presented his report as Chancellor. (Page 120.)

Dr. L. F. London presented his report as historiographer. (Page 120.)

The Report of the Trustees of St. Mary's School was read by the Bishop. It was supplemented by a talk by the Chaplain, Rev. H. F. Kloman. (Page 121.)

The Report of the Woman's Auxiliary was presented by title and ordered printed in the Journal. (Page 123.)

The Report of the Laymen's League was made by Mr. N. A. Gregory. (Page 124.)

The Report of the Treasurer was presented by Mr. J. M. Sink, Jr. (Page 85.)

The Report of the Managers of the Thompson Orphanage was read by Mr. M. D. Whisnant and was supplemented by a talk by Mr. L. E. Watt. (Page 126.)

Rev. David W. Yates spoke on the work of the University of the South.

The Rev. E. H. Goold presented the Report of St. Augustine's College and its associated institutions. (Page 127.)

The Bishop then appointed the following committees:

On Canons: Rev. R. B. Owens, Rev. H. N. Bowne, Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Mr. Kemp D. Battle, Mr. F. O. Clarkson.

On the State of the Church: Rev. E. B. Guerry, Rev. W. P. Price, Mr. F. M. Shannonhouse, Mr. R. C. Howison, Mr. W. J. Walker.

On Unfinished Business: Rev. Robert M. Bird, Mr. C. H. Hasty, Mr. C. M. Whitlock.

Rev. R. B. Owens presented the Report of the Committee on Canons as follows:

Your Committee on Canons respectfully reports as follows:

We submit by title certain amendments to the Constitution that were adopted by the last General Convention and are made known hereby to the Diocese as is required by Article 14 in the Constitution.

Several Proposed Amendments to the Canons were referred to us by the last Convention. Our report on these is as follows:

1. In regard to the proposed amendment (p. 29 (4) of the 1940 Journal), we offer this resolution—

“Resolved that Canon XX be designated Canon XX Sec. 1 and that a new Sec. 2 be added reading as follows: ‘All grants in aid of Diocesan Missions from whatever source be deemed appropriated for use in the fiscal year in which and for which they are made; and such grant shall create no obligation to continue the grant beyond the fiscal year in which the arrangement is made unless otherwise expressly agreed upon in writing.’”

2. (on p. 29 Journal) An amendment to Canon XXII, which would give vestries the right to fill vacancies that may occur in the vestry.

Since the present canon *apparently* leaves this matter to the discretion of the individual vestry it is our opinion that further legislation is unnecessary. We ask to be discharged from further consideration of the matter.

3. (on p. 29 Journal) A resolution looking to changes in eligibility for election on the Executive Council.

We are of the opinion that this would be a wise change. We offer the following resolution: “Resolved that Canon XXII Sec. 2 be amended by changing the word ‘one’ in the last line to the word ‘three.’”

4. Since at present the Treasurer of the Diocese is a Bank, and not an individual we do not think that a Corporation should be entitled ex-officio to a seat and a vote in the convention. Therefore, “Resolved that Sec. 3 of Canon VII be stricken out.”

Certain other suggested amendments have been sent to us from the Executive Council.

5. A resolution regarding assessments against missions on account of fire insurance premiums.

Inasmuch as the assessments for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund are not made by Canon, but by resolution of the Convention, we think it would be improper to incorporate this item into a Canon. We ask to be discharged.

6. That a Canon be enacted requiring a two year probationary period, after notice of intention to apply for Parochial status is given by a mission, before such mission may be admitted to the status of a parish.

We are in full sympathy with the purpose of this proposed amendment, but we believe that the same result may be obtained by the exercise of greater care on the part of the Committee on New Parishes by a more thorough investigation of all such applications than is possible under our present procedure. We therefore offer the following resolution: "Resolved that Canon XXI on the Organization of Parishes, Sec. 1, subsection 'fourth' be amended by striking out in line 1 the words 'To the Convention' and substituting the words 'To the Committee on New Parishes at least thirty days before the meeting of the Convention.'"

7. A request that the Committee on Canons delineate the relationship of parochial missions to the Diocese.

This request involves numerous problems and difficulties with which we are not prepared to deal unless we have much further information from the Diocesan Authorities, questions such as titles to property, Representations to conventions, apportionments and assessments, Parochial reports,—and many others.

The function of the Committee on Canons is not to formulate policies for the Convention, but to provide machinery whereby the policies of the Convention may be put into effect.

We therefore ask that the Convention refer this matter back to the Executive Council and the Bishop, and request them to formulate some definite policy that will simplify and clarify the status of missions. We will then be glad to offer canons to put such policy into effect.

The Report of the Committee on Canons was adopted.

On motion of Mr. A. B. Andrews it was resolved that an annotated edition of the Canons be compiled and presented at the next Convention.

Rev. J. Q. Beckwith offered an amendment to Canon XVII suggesting further qualifications for membership in the Executive Council. It was referred to the Committee on Canons.

Rev. A. S. Lawrence offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Whereas the basis of assessments and quotas adopted by the General Convention differs from that of the Diocese of North Carolina, and,

Whereas the Parochial Report Blanks issued by General Convention do not provide for the peculiarities of the Diocese of North Carolina and much confusion results therefrom,

Therefore be it RESOLVED: that the basis for the assessments for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund in this diocese be "Current Expenses" as listed in the official Parochial Report Blank, this item including "Salaries of Clergy," "Salaries of Lay-Workers," "Organist, Music, and Choir," "Insurance," "Other Current Operating Expenses."

Mr. S. E. Burroughs for the Department of Finance reported that they had considered Mr. Guerry's resolution but disapproved of it. Mr. Guerry's resolution was then defeated and the report of the department was approved.

Mr. S. E. Burroughs recommended further that certain arrears against certain parishes be remitted. On motion of the Rev. Willis G. Clark, D.D., the report was amended so as to remit all arrears against St. Andrew's, Charlotte. So amended the report was adopted.

The Convention then took a recess.

At 8 p.m. the Convention reassembled for service in the church. Shortened Evening Prayer was said by the Rector, and the Bishop preached the sermon. The offerings of the congregation were received for the New York Bible and Common Prayer Book Society.

WEDNESDAY

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 a.m. with the Bishop as Celebrant assisted by the Rector.

At 9:30 a.m. Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. James S. Cox and the Bishop.

The Convention reconvened at 10:15 a.m. Rev. F. B. Drane offered the following resolution:

Resolved that a committee of three be appointed to investigate the matter of blanket insurance on mission property and report back to the Convention next year.

For the Committee on the Place of the Next Convention the Rev. W. J. Gordon reported that they had chosen Chapel Hill. The report was adopted unanimously.

On motion the Secretary was instructed to send greetings to the clergy unable to be present and also to the Convention of Western North Carolina.

The Rev. C. A. Cole presented the report of the Committee on the State of the Church. (Page 130.) With the addition of two items to the Diocesan objectives the report was adopted.

The Committee on Credentials reported the delegate from Ansonville was entitled to a seat in the Convention and that otherwise the roll as called was correct.

Rev. R. B. Owens made a supplementary report for the Committee on Canons as follows:

1. We have considered the resolution of the Rev. J. Q. Beckwith relating to elections to the Executive Council.

Your committee is in complete sympathy with the purpose of the resolution to secure representation of the Missionary Clergy on the Council, but we are unanimously of the opinion that it would be unwise to adopt this amendment, for the reason that it adds another to the already too numerous restrictions which tend to hamper the free choice of the Convention in electing its Executive Council. We therefore ask to be discharged from further consideration of the amendment.

Rev. R. B. Owens then moved to reconsider the report of the Committee on Canons adopted yesterday. Motion carried. He then moved that that part of the report which directed the Executive Council to formulate a policy regulating the relationship of Missions to the Diocese be rescinded. Motion carried. After considerable discussion he then offered the following resolution:

Resolved that the Bishop appoint a committee of five persons to study the whole question of the relationship of Missions—Diocesan and Parochial—to the Diocese and report to the next Convention; the above committee to furnish a report of its findings and recommendations to the Committee on Canons at least sixty days before the next Convention, so that the Committee on Canons may formulate a canon to put the recommendations of the special Committee on Missions into effect.

Resolution adopted.

Rev. C. E. B. Robinson then moved that the Committee

on Canons publish its proposed canon in ample time, so that the clerical and lay delegates to the next Convention may have the opportunity to study it before the Convention meets. The resolution was adopted.

Mr. Kemp Yarborough offered the following resolution:

Resolved that the Executive Council be instructed to study the question of the membership of the council, with a view of gaining a personnel more truly representative of the Diocese, and to report to the next Convention.

The resolution was adopted.

The following resolution was also adopted and referred to the Executive Council:

Resolved, that the recommendations of the Committee on the State of the Church, with respect to representations of the smaller parishes and missions in the delegations of the Diocese to the Synod and the General Convention, be referred to the Executive Council for considerations, to the end that it may make a report and recommendations on this subject to the next meeting of the Diocesan Convention.

The Rev. T. A. Cheatham reported for the Committee on the Bishop's Address as follows:

COMMITTEE ON THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS

We, your committee appointed to consider certain matters mentioned in the Bishop's address, beg leave to report as follows:

ARMY CAMPS:

After inquiry we believe that no immediate action is needed, but the plans of the Government call for the enlisting of so many of our young men and women that the Church should at least begin to make plans so that it will be ready to meet the situation as the movement develops. We suggest the appointment of an Army Camp Commission.

SEWANEE:

As we watch the ever-growing enrollments of our large Universities, and the consequent dangers that are inherent in the larger freedom of the so called "liberal" forces, there must come to many of us the realization of the vital importance of *Christian* education, and the priceless possibilities of our great institution of learning at Sewanee. Your committee feels that this is a more vital matter than many of us realize, and that this Diocese would be acting wisely, first, in recognizing its financial responsibility to our own Sewanee. To this end we recommend a Sewanee Sunday with emphasis on our Diocesan responsibility and quota credit. In

the second place, we urge a fuller realization of Sewanee's cultural advantages. This applies not only to the Theological Department, but to the University as well.

SAINT MARY'S:

The Bishop calls our attention to the Saint Mary's Centennial, which will be celebrated during the coming year. Our interest in Saint Mary's is so deep that we need only to be reminded of the psychological possibility of using this occasion for a large service to this institution so dear to our hearts. We recommend a special committee to work out the details of this opportunity.

FORWARD IN SERVICE:

The Presiding Bishop has called us to take part in the Forward in Service Movement, and our own Bishop not only in his address to the Convention, but also in his earnest and moving sermon last night, has expressed his large hope and expectation.

Even a casual observer must have noticed how the worldwide confusion is bringing to the hearts of our people the very deep realization of the vital need of religion. Darkness is the great *negative* and light is the *positive* that can only dispell the darkness. The world is probably more negative than it has ever been in its history. Only the light that was revealed by the Son of God can penetrate and dispell this gathering darkness. This situation, so terrible to contemplate, brings to the Church a far-reaching opportunity. Your committee urges with all the emphasis that it can command, that we as a Diocese undertake in a definite and specific way to enter deeply into this program of Forward in Service in the name of the Prince of Peace, who alone can bring the answer to the problems of our disordered world. We believe that the Church has the largest opportunity that it has faced in many generations.

On motion the recommendations of the Committee were adopted as resolutions: (1) that an Army Camp Commission be appointed, (2) that Sewanee Sunday be kept in the Diocese, (3) that a committee on St. Mary's Centennial be appointed.

The Bishop nominated as Examining Chaplains the Rev. R. Bruce Owens, Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence, Rev. F. Craighill Brown, Rev. Edgar H. Goold, and the Rev. B. N. deFoe Wagner. The nominations were confirmed by the Convention.

Ballots were then distributed and the Convention pro-

ceeded to elections. On motion the Rules of Order were suspended, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for candidates where there was no contest. The Bishop appointed as tellers the Rev. J. N. Bynum, Mr. Cameron McRae, Mr. E. Hartley, the Rev. W. P. Price, Mr. Clayton White, Mr. A. G. Corpening.

On motion of Mr. A. B. Andrews the rules were suspended and Mr. Paul F. Smith and Mr. J. B. Cheshire were unanimously chosen as the Trustees of the Diocese.

During the counting of the ballots the business of the Convention continued.

The Rev. W. S. Turner reported for the Committee on Assistance to the Bishop. (Page 132.) The two resolutions attached were adopted, the second by a rising vote.

Mr. W. C. Cagle reported for the Smith Vocational Trust. The report was received and filed.

Mr. Kemp D. Battle reported for the special committee appointed to advise with the Trustees as to the Smith Trust as follows:

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE

ON THAT PART OF ANNUAL REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESE RELATING TO THE GENERAL WM. A. SMITH WILL

The Special Committee appointed to make recommendations to the Convention as to the course which should be followed in respect to the administration of the trust funds set up under the Will of General William A. Smith (Will Book "G," page 6, office Clerk Superior Court, Anson County) makes the following report:

We have given to this matter such consideration as the time at our disposal permitted and have arrived at certain conclusions which we here set forth. The Will of General Smith, a rather long and complicated document, sets up several trusts in connection with which the Protestant Episcopal Church is concerned. Condensed and simplified, they are as follows:

A. By Item XVII \$5,500 is given to the Thompson Orphanage. No question concerning this bequest is raised.

B. By Item XIX, certain shares of bank stock are constituted as a trust fund to be administered by the executor and the income to be used for upkeep of All Souls' Church, Ansonville, no question concerning this trust is at issue.

C. By Item XXI, three separate trust funds aggregating \$55,000 are bequeathed to three separate banks as trustees to accumulate the income for 99 years, the total fund as then constituted to be applied to the purposes mentioned in the next paragraph.

D. By Item XXII, all the residuary estate is set up as a trust as follows:

The Convention of this Diocese is directed to appoint three administering trustees, members of our denomination. (We use the term "administering trustees" to distinguish them from the banks holding the funds.) Such trustees are authorized to expend from the capital assets up to \$50,000 for buildings "in or near the village of Ansonville," and thereafter to use the income of any residue in the maintenance of "Schools for both sexes of the white race. Educational and Industrial schools, Hospitals, gymnasiums, and other purposes in their discretion—mainly and principally I have in mind training youth trades and domestic arts," etc. Such trustees appointed by Diocesan Convention are to serve for terms of three years and their successors are to be similarly appointed from time to time. At the end of 99 years the specific trust funds described in the preceding paragraph are to be administered by the same trustees for the same purposes. The administering trustees so selected are to make annual detailed reports to this convention accompanied by auditor's reports.

General Smith died, we are told, on April 16, 1934, and on May 9, 1934, this Convention meeting at St. Martin's Church, Charlotte, appointed as trustees Messrs. Bennett D. Nelme, C. B. Cagle, and William L. Marshall, Jr. They have been since periodically re-appointed and with the exception of Mr. Nelme, who died in 1940, are now serving. The Committee was much impressed with the account given to it by Mr. Cagle of the ingenious and successful manner in which they have accomplished, with limited disposable sums, the essential purpose of the trust.

Pursuant to directions of this Convention, 1939 Session, the Trustees of the Diocese brought suit in the Courts of North Carolina to seek an interpretation of the will which would permit some use of the \$55,000 trust funds or income therefrom prior to expiration of the 99 year period. The Supreme Court held the provisions of the Will requiring accumulation of income for 99 years to be valid and binding.

From this necessarily condensed statement, certain conclusions stand out.

In the first place, the purpose of the trusts designated above as "C" and "D" is fundamentally educational and not religious in character. The generosity of the donor, admirable in purpose and beneficent in result, can attain no end directly within the scope of our particular domain. No part of those trusts can inure to our benefit or be subject to our disposition, either now or at the end of the 99 years.

In the second place, the Convention has no power of control over the trustees which it appoints and no function except to appoint them and receive reports. If those reports reveal policies or acts

contrary to our wishes and judgment, we are without power except to elect other trustees on expiration of present terms. It seems undesirable for the church to be in a position to receive criticism for policies which it cannot control. This point is mentioned without any reflection on the administration of the present trustees, which so far as we are advised has been admirable.

In the third place, the Church is not equipped by personnel or experience to enter, either directly or by appointees, the general field of trust administration. The Courts are equipped to perform that function, to appoint suitable trustees and supervise their actions.

In the fourth place, it cannot be seen that appointment of trustees by the Courts and examination of the trustees' reports will in any way defeat the purpose of the will, hamper the administration of the trusts, or require any change in present policies of the administering trustees. If we step aside, the trusts will not fail for want of a trustee. In all probability the same Episcopalian trustees whom we would appoint on recommendation of the local parish or mission will be appointed by the Court on a similar recommendation.

We are aware of an element of embarrassment in renouncing the trust after once accepting it. Obviously we acted hastily in undertaking to name trustees within less than a month of General Smith's death. But we should not, because of that appreciative impulsiveness, undertake to carry for another ninety years a responsibility which can be better borne by the agency established by the civil authority for that purpose. We therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved by the Diocesan Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina that although we appreciate and honor the generous impulses which animated our deceased member, Gen. William A. Smith, in designating this body to appoint trustees to administer the charitable and educational trusts set up in Items XXI and XXII of his Will, we are of the opinion that the objects of those trusts will be better realized by confiding the appointment of such trustees and the supervision of their acts to the Courts of the State exercising jurisdiction of such matters. The Trustees of the Diocese are therefore directed to institute and carry forward such legal proceedings as may be necessary for this body to renounce and disclaim any responsibilities and privileges conferred on it by said items of the will, and to transfer the actual administration of such trusts to trustees appointed by courts of competent jurisdiction on the expiration of the terms of the present administering trustees. Be it also resolved that we express to the present trustees our sincere thanks for their self-sacrificing efforts in the administration of said trusts and assure

them that this action in no way arises from any dissatisfaction with their acts or policies.

The Bishop nominated as members of the Murdoch Society the Rev. R. Bruce Owens, the Rev. I. Harding Hughes, Mr. William H. Hardin. He also nominated as Chancellor Mr. Alexander B. Andrews. All nominations were confirmed by the Convention.

The Rev. W. S. Turner offered the following resolutions which were adopted:

Resolved, that the Convention express its appreciation of the satisfactory manner in which the Security National Bank (& Mr. J. M. Sink, Jr., Assistant Trust Officer) are discharging their responsibilities as Treasurer of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund and Treasurer of the Church's Program Fund.

Resolved, that the Convention commend the splendid work of the Superintendent of the Thompson Orphanage, Mr. Whisnant, Mrs. Whisnant, and the Staff, and express our gratitude to them for their fine methods of management which are producing many desired improvements and resulting in gratifying progress of the Orphanage in fulfilling its high purpose.

The Report of the Good Samaritan Hospital was received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Page 135.)

The Rev. Roma C. Fortune presented his report by sign. It was read by the Bishop. (Page 136.)

The Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., began his report on Vade Mecum but as the time for recess had come part of the report was deferred until the afternoon.

Col. Joseph Hyde Pratt offered the following resolution which was adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved, that the 125th Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina express to the Rector, Vestry, and congregation of the Church of the Holy Comforter and the people of Burlington its keenest and sincerest thanks, appreciation, and gratitude for the gracious hospitality and splendid reception extended to its delegates, and for the very satisfactory arrangements that were made for carrying on the work of the Convention.

The Convention reconvened at 2:15.

The Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., completed the report on Vade Mecum. (Page 136.)

The Committee on the Report of the Trustees reported as follows:

Your committee respectfully reports that on examination of the report of the Trustees of the Diocese, we find the report very fully covers the activities of the Trustees and that the accounts of the Trustees have been properly audited by a firm of Certified Public Accountants. We therefore recommend that the report be accepted.

The report of the Examining Chaplains was presented by title. (Page 140.)

The report of the Murdoch Memorial Society was also presented by title. (Page 140.)

Mr. S. E. Burroughs presented a further supplementary financial report. He offered the following resolution:

Resolved, that the Bishop appoint a Diocesan Committee of three to be known as the Committee on Church Pension Arrearages. The resolution was adopted.

The Rev. David W. Yates offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved, that the 1942 assessments of missions for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund be increased by an amount not to exceed the premium on the first insurance protecting the mission property, at the discretion of the Executive Council.

The committee to consider Mr. Hairston's resolution offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved, that this convention of the Diocese of North Carolina go on record as expressing its deep sympathy for all suffering from world conditions, particularly the people of the Mother Church of England; and that the prayers of the people of this diocese be offered in their behalf.

Greetings from the Diocese of Western North Carolina were received and read by the Secretary.

The Rev. W. S. Turner gave an oral report of the work of the Forward in Service Committee.

The Committee on Unfinished Business reported that with the exception of appointment of certain committees the business was complete.

The Report of the *North Carolina Churchman* was made by title and ordered printed in the Journal. (Page 141.)

The Rev. A. Stratton Lawrence, Jr., offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Whereas the present method of Church's Program Assessment does not offer incentive to missions to become more and more self-supporting,

Be it resolved: that the whole plan of Church's Program Assessments be restudied and that the method of assessment used by the United States government in determining Income Tax be considered in this connection,

And further that this matter be referred to Finance Committee with request that they call into consultation representatives of missions and make a report to the 1942 convention.

Mr. J. S. Holmes reported as Trustee of Kanuga. (Page 142.)

The Rev. James D. Beckwith read the report of the Commission on Faith and Order. (Page 143.)

The Rev. William J. Gordon offered a resolution indorsing the work of the American Bible Society and promising support. The resolution was adopted.

The final report of the Church Pension Fund Committee was received and is printed in the Journal. (Page 145.)

On motion the reading of the minutes of the second day was dispensed with.

After the singing of the *Gloria in excelsis* and the Benediction by the Bishop, the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

APPENDIX A

ADDRESS AND JOURNAL OF THE BISHOP

Address of the Bishop

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

In welcoming you to the One Hundred and Twenty-Fifth Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina, I can think of no more appropriate greeting than the admonition of St. Paul to the Corinthian Church that was confronted with "many adversaries." "Watch ye," he said, "stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong."

This beautiful Church building in which we have assembled is a symbol of the many excellent things that have come out of this interesting parish. The history of the Episcopal Church in this community can be traced as far back as 1871. In the Diocesan Journal for that year, the Rev. John R. Joyner, Priest in Charge of St. Barnabas' Church, Greensboro, reports: "I have monthly meetings at Company Shops, Alamance County, during the year. Baptisms: one white infant. Communicants: three. Offerings: \$19.73." In 1886, the Rev. Franklin L. Bush, assistant in St. Bartholomew's Church, Pittsboro, reports that he had officiated monthly at St. Athanasius' Church, Company Shops, and that there were 25 communicants and a Sunday School enrollment of thirty-five. Two years later, in response to what was called a "stirring up an interest" in behalf of the American Church Building Fund, St. Athanasius made an offering of \$2.23. There is no record of what sum might have been given if sufficient interest had not been aroused. In 1887 the name "Burlington" appears for the first time in place of "Company Shops." At the Convention meeting in St. Luke's, Salisbury, the following year, this Mission was formally admitted into union with the Convention. Four years later, 1892, it became a Parish. Bishop Lyman refers to extensive missionary work in the surrounding districts. He mentions St. John's Mission, North Burlington, St. Paul's Mission, East Burlington. A year goes by and St. Mary's, for colored people, has been started. The zeal and earnestness of half a century ago have not diminished with the passage of time. Evidence of this "spirit of missions" appears with inspiring frequency. On All Saints' Day, 1934,

old St. Athanasius' Church building, having been renovated and beautified, was given over to the Deaf congregation in this community. On the same day, the corner stone of Calvary Chapel, Graham, was laid. On January 5th of the present year, St. Andrew's, Trollinwood, was formally opened for worship in the presence of a devoted congregation. When the Diocesan Convention met here in 1927, Bishop Cheshire referred to the beauty of this Church and described its donor as "the most munificent benefactor whom the Diocese has ever known." Since that day, time has removed the personalities and the proper restraints surrounding them, which leaves us free to pay tribute today to Mr. Lawrence S. Holt, who had a vision of a missionary Church at work in Alamance County, in the Diocese of North Carolina and beyond, and who set up a trust to provide the means whereby his dream, under God, might come true.

How encouraging it is to remember, as we meet under such favorable auspices, that even this Parish once had its day of small things. It teaches us that where we "plant and water" faithfully, God graciously "gives the increase."

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FIELDS OF LABOR

The following changes in the Fields of Labor occurred during the year:

Jan. 7, The vacancies at All Saints, Warrenton, St. Anna's, Littleton, and St. Luke's, Warren County, were filled by the Rev. Robert Josiah Johnson, D.D., Priest in Charge.

Jan. 16, The Rev. Wm. Martin Latta became Rector of Calvary Church, Wadesboro, and Priest in Charge of All Souls' Mission, Ansonville.

Apr. 1, Certain Edgecombe County missions became vacant upon the resignation of the Rev. Gray Temple. These missions have since been served by the Rev. M. George Henry, Rector of Calvary Parish, Tarboro.

April 30, St. Martin's Parish, Charlotte, became vacant upon the resignation of the Rev. John Long Jackson. During the year St. Martin's has been served by visiting clergymen. The position was filled on May 1st of this year by the Rev. C. Alfred Cole.

May 1, St. Andrew's Parish, Charlotte, became vacant upon the resignation of the Rev. Jesse Starnes Lockaby. His work has been assumed by the Rev. Wm. H. Wheeler. Mr. Lockaby remains canonically resident in this diocese.

May 1, The Rev. I. Harding Hughes became Priest in Charge of St. Mark's, Mecklenburg County, succeeding Mr. Lockaby.

Oct. 1, The Rev. Daniel W. Allen gave up the charge of St. Paul's Mission, Salisbury, and was succeeded on the same day by the Rev. Edward B. Guerry.

Oct. 1, The Rev. Wm. J. Gordon relinquished the care of Christ Church, Milton, and the Rev. Rufus J. Womble immediately took his place.

Nov. 30, St. Saviour's, Raleigh, became vacant when the Rev. Louis A. Haskell removed to Southern Virginia. This position has been filled this year by the Rev. Charles Frederick Wulf.

Dec. 1, All Saints', Roanoke Rapids, and St. Luke's, Northampton County, vacant for many months, were filled when the Rev. Edmund Berkeley took charge.

One resignation occurred during the year, that of the Rev. Jesse Starnes Lockaby, May 1, who remains a non-parochial priest of this diocese.

There was one retirement, that of the Rev. Reuben Meredith, November 1, Rector of Christ Church, Cleveland, and Priest in Charge of St. Matthew's, Rowan County. Mr. Meredith has made his home in Oxford.

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SUMMARY OF OFFICIAL ACTS

My official acts within the diocese may be summarized as follows :

I made 107 Visitations ; celebrated the Holy Communion 28 times, officiated at 4 Baptisms, 5 Weddings, 5 Funerals and 27 other services ; ordained one Candidate for Holy Orders to the Diaconate, and advanced one Deacon to the Priesthood ; I consecrated one Church building, laid the corner stone of 2 others and formally opened 2 Churches for worship ; I confirmed 703 persons and Bishop Jett, acting for me, confirmed 11. Of this total of 714, 106 were Negroes and 8 were members of our Deaf congregations. I licensed 33 Lay Readers, admitted 4 Postulants and 1 Candidate for Holy Orders. I attended 62 committee or trustee meetings, engaged in 140 individual or group conferences, delivered 60 addresses and lectures and preached 94 times.

Outside the diocese, I celebrated the Holy Communion once, baptized 3 infants, attended 4 committee meetings and 5 conferences, took part in the Consecration of a Bishop, delivered 3 lectures and preached 12 sermons. I also attended all the sessions of the House of Bishops and the Joint meetings of the two Houses of General Convention.

One of the new responsibilities that the Country's Defense Program has imposed on the Church is to provide, as far as practicable and necessary, for the moral and spiritual welfare of the men in training. It is evident from the immense appropriations of the Federal government for the erection of Chapels in forts and camps that the value of worship and other religious exercises has been recognized as an essential element in maintaining

a high morale among officers and men. It is also apparent that unprecedented care is being exercised in the selection of commissioned chaplains. I feel as if we have reason to assure those whose families are represented at the training centers that their sons will not be deprived of religious facilities and advantages. These are limited to what the Church can do within the military establishments by reason of official discipline. But there are practically no limits as to what the Church can do in the immediate neighborhood of camps by providing a helpful environment of hospitality in private houses, wholesome recreation and social influences. It happens that to date no training areas have been established within the boundaries of this diocese except the unit at the Charlotte air port. However, it is possible as all branches of the service are enlarged, additional camps may be erected in North Carolina in places where the local Church would not be equal to such an emergency. In these instances, the program of the neighboring parishes would have to be reinforced by a diocesan organization whose function it would be to supplement local efforts with funds or equipment or personnel.

With this contingency in mind, I ask this Convention to take such action as its judgment may determine to be prepared to minister to the men in military service, as opportunity may offer or as conditions may require.

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ST. MARY'S CENTENNIAL

In a little more than a year from now—May 16-19, 1942, to be exact—St. Mary's School and Junior College will commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of its founding. This event will be observed with an appropriate program of historical and academic features that have been in preparation for many months. While the Trustees have not yet officially adopted a financial objective as part of this anniversary program, it is likely that an organized effort will be made within the year to raise a Centennial Fund for the improvement of present facilities, the erection of new buildings, the increase of

the School's endowment, and the creation of scholarships. St. Mary's is the oldest institution in this diocese. As a matter of fact, it is one of the oldest and largest Church schools for girls in the country. It has an honorable past; its record for the maintenance of academic standards and for the cultivation of Christian character constitutes one of the most distinguished educational achievements under the auspices of our Church. I mention this Centennial now, for it will be almost upon us before we meet again. I am concerned for each of you to be prepared and eager to share in an occasion that will honor St. Mary's significant past and provide for its increase in the future.

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SEWANEE THEOLOGICAL SCHOOL

Last fall, General Convention, by official action, requested the Presiding Bishop to designate one Sunday in each year on which the subject of Theological Education would be discussed from the pulpit and an offering would be taken and given to the Seminary of the rector's choice. The Presiding Bishop named April 27th as Theological Education Sunday for this year, but I have made no effort to broadcast or reinforce his request in this diocese, believing that such a special observance might be more properly made if it represented our own Convention action.

We are agreed concerning the necessity for an adequate Theological training for our clergy. The basis of all action is doctrinal. The creed is the reason for the deed. Christian service, indeed the whole Church's program, is the practical fruit of the doctrinal tree. It is evident that the ministry of the Church can rise no higher than the theological equipment of its ordained leaders. The welfare of our Seminaries, therefore, and the quality of instruction they must supply is a major consideration of the Church.

In this connection, I refer to the Theological School at Sewanee. We had in our budget for the University of the South an item of \$2000, which was reduced to \$500 in January of this year, when the current operating budget

was adopted. The reduction of 75% in this item was a severe disappointment to Sewanee's administration, particularly since this diocese did not take part officially in the Rehabilitation Fund of over \$400,000, that the Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Guerry, has raised in recent years, nor have we adopted a Sewanee Sunday in North Carolina, as we have been urged to do. The question may be asked with fairness, whether North Carolina, as one of the owning dioceses, has discharged its full obligation to Sewanee since its contribution to the Endowment Fund about fifteen years ago. In the face of this two-fold responsibility for our Church Seminaries and for Sewanee in particular by reason of our proprietary interest in this southern institution, it seems to me that this convention might adopt a date for the observance of Theological Sunday, as required by the General Convention, and, where there was no local objection, apply the offerings throughout the diocese on that day, with quota credit, to the Sewanee item in our budget. This suggestion, if approved by this Convention, should not contravene or deny to any rector the right to determine how the offering in his Church might be otherwise designated. I venture the hope that my proposal would discharge the two-fold function of satisfying the mandate of General Convention and also of meeting our obligation as one of Sewanee's constituents and legal proprietors.

* * * * *

FORWARD IN SERVICE

The most significant feature of the General Convention meeting in Kansas City last fall was the inauguration of a movement entitled "Forward in Service." This plan was projected under the inspiring leadership of the Presiding Bishop, and was enthusiastically approved by the two Houses of the Convention in joint session. The purpose of this Ten Year Plan is to quicken the life of the individual Church member with such a degree of sincerity that he will inevitably devote himself to some form of Christian service.

The first phase of this movement in North Carolina

was a diocesan-wide offering in Aid to British Missions, the goal adopted by the General Convention for the entire Church being \$300,000. The special treasurer of this fund, Mr. Kemp P. Lewis, will make his report to this Convention. It is sufficient for me to say, and gratefully, that in response to this appeal the diocese has contributed in excess of our proportionate share of this fund. This money has been cheerfully and spontaneously given.

The second step of "Forward in Service" was the adoption of a Three Year Plan for the Diocese by our clergy at their Pre-Lenten Conference. The objectives are as follows:

1. Confirmations:
 - 1941: 800
 - 1942: 900
 - 1943: 1000
2. Organizations:
 - 1941: A Woman's Auxiliary in every church.
 - 1942: Y. P. S. L. in every church.
 - 1943: Laymen's League in every church.
3. Missions:

Resident minister in Salisbury Missions.
Resident minister in Edgecombe Co.
 - 1942 New Church in Kannapolis.
Resident Negro minister in Winston-Salem.
 - 1943 Negro Church in Weldon
Resident minister in Sanford.

The third step in our diocesan organization was the appointment of a strong committee under the able chairmanship of the Rev. Wm. S. Turner. They have already entered upon their duties with great earnestness and skill. The endorsement by this Convention of the Forward in Service movement would be an appropriate expression of loyalty to our Presiding Bishop, and also evidence of our determination to do our full part as Christian disciples and as Church members, under the guidance of God's Spirit, for the redemption of this evil day.

COMMENTS:

All recorded cash receipts were traced into the bank accounts of the several funds. Receipts from Endowment and Trust Funds were confirmed directly by the trustee banks. Payments made by missions and parishes on pledges and assessments and other items of income were not verified beyond the records of the Diocesan Treasurers. All disbursements were made on properly executed checks.

Due to the fact that no separate bank account is maintained by the Security National Bank, Treasurer for monies on deposit to the credit of the Treasurer of the Diocese of North Carolina, (all monies being deposited in the general bank account of the Trust Department of the Security National Bank), cash on deposit at January 31, 1941 to the credit of the Treasurer of the Diocese of North Carolina could not be verified beyond the records of the Treasurer. However a reconciliation of the Bank Account of the Trust Department of the Bank was examined and found to be in order.

EPISCOPAL MAINTENANCE FUND

Exhibit "A" reflects the financial condition of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund at January 31, 1941.

Assessments Receivable are shown in detail on Schedule 1. As will be noted these assessments are off-set by a reserve. This reserve has been set up to exclude the uncollected assessments.

from the surplus account. As assessments are paid they are then taken into the income account.

The amount due Mr. Henry M. London represents a returned check charged against the personal bank account of Mr. London in 1939 and redeposited in error to the credit of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund.

1941 Prepaid Assessments are shown in detail on Schedule 2.

Exhibit "B" shows the actual income and expense items of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund for the year ended January 31, 1941 compared with budget estimates.

Cash receipts and disbursements for the year ended January 31, 1941 as distinguished from income and expense items are shown in summary form on Exhibit "C."

CHURCH'S PROGRAM FUND

The financial condition of the Church's Program Fund at January 31, 1941 is shown on Exhibit "D."

A comparison of actual income and expense items with budget estimates for the year ended January 31, 1941 for the Church's Program Fund is shown on Exhibit "E." Income items are shown in more detail on Schedules 3 to 5 inclusive. The details of the several expense classifications are shown on Schedules 6 to 11 inclusive.

Exhibit "F" shows in summary form the cash receipts and disbursements of the Church's Program Fund for the year ended January 31, 1941.

TRUST FUNDS

Cash receipts and disbursements for the year ended January 31, 1941 of those trusts not administered by the Security National Bank, Custodian, are shown on Exhibit "G."

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE

To the Diocesan Convention at Burlington, N. C., May 6-7, 1941.

The Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina had six meetings during the year 1940 as follows:

On March 12, 1940 the Committee met at the office of the Secretary, Raleigh, N. C., and took the following action:

Consent of this Committee was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend John Long Jackson, Rector of Saint Martin's Church, Charlotte, in this Diocese, as Bishop of the Diocese of Louisiana, by a unanimous vote, and certificate to that effect was signed and sent by Air Mail so that it would arrive before Bishop Jackson's consecration.

On May 7, 1940, the Committee met again in the Parish House of Saint Peter's Church, Charlotte, and took the following action.

Rufus Josephus Womble, a candidate for Holy Orders, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

On June 6, 1940 the Committee met at the office of the Secretary, Raleigh, N. C., and the following action was taken:

The Committee was organized by the election of the following: Reverend Isaac Wayne Hughes, President; Mr. Joseph B. Cheshire, Secretary.

William Penn Price, a Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood at any time after June 18, 1940.

On September 12, 1940 the Committee met at the office of the Secretary, Raleigh, N. C., and the following action was taken, the Bishop of the Diocese being present:

The Bishop presented to the Committee a request of the Wardens and Vestry of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, N. C., for the consent of the Bishop, with the approval of this Committee, to the execution of a mortgage for \$4800.00 on the Parish Rectory of the said Church to the American Church Building Fund Commission, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, N. Y., the principal and interest being payable in installments over a period of years, and the same was approved and the consent of this Committee given accordingly.

Consent was given to the election and consecration of the Very Reverend Walter Henry Gray, B.D., as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Connecticut.

On October 2, 1940 the Committee met at the office of the Secretary, Raleigh, N. C., and the following action was taken, the Bishop of the Diocese being present:

The Bishop requested the consent of this Committee for the Wardens and Vestry of Holy Innocents Church, Henderson, N. C., to execute a mortgage on the Rectory of the said Church for \$2,000.00 to the Home Building and Loan Association, Henderson, N. C., for repairs to the said Church, Parish House, and Rectory. The Com-

mittee approved of the said mortgage and gave its consent to the same.

On December 17, 1940 the Committee met again at the office of the Secretary, Raleigh, N. C., and took the following action, the Bishop of the Diocese being present:

The Bishop presented his proposed Schedule of Appropriations of the Income for 1941 from the Lawrence S. Holt Trust Fund, and the same was approved by the Committee and the Bishop was authorized to use in his discretion, within the terms of the Trust, any undesignated balance from said Income.

Upon request of the Bishop of the Diocese the advice and consent of this Committee was given to allow the Wardens and Vestry of All Saints Parish, Roanoke Rapids, N. C., to execute and deliver a bond and mortgage for \$500.00 on the Rectory of the said Church for the purpose of repairing the said Rectory. The said mortgage to be made to the Roanoke Rapids Building & Loan Association.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

FOR INFORMATION

Since the last Convention four meetings of the Diocesan Executive Council have been held—in June, September, January, and April.

At the June meeting the Bishop appointed the members of the Council to the following departments:

FINANCE: Messrs. Stephen E. Burroughs, Chairman; Arthur H. London, and Kemp P. Lewis.

MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION: Rev. D. W. Yates, Chairman; Rev. John A. Wright, Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Mrs. William J. Gordon, and Mr. George C. Pollard.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, Jr., Chairman; Rev. J. A. Vaché, Col. Joseph Hyde Pratt, Mr. George C. Pollard, and Mrs. Carl H. Herndon.

FIELD AND PUBLICITY: Rev. M. George Henry, Chairman; Rev. John A. Wright, Mr. Hobart T. Steele, Mrs. William J. Gordon, Mrs. W. S. Holmes, and Mr. William T. Anderson.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS: Rev. Willis G. Clark, D.D., Chairman; Col. Joseph Hyde Pratt, and Mrs. George Watts Carr.

The 1941 assessments of parishes and missions for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund were based on ten per cent of current operating expenses for 1939. The churches' quotas for the Church's Program Fund were arrived at by averaging: (1) \$5.00 per communicant for parishes, \$2.50 for organized missions, and \$1.00 for unorganized missions; (2) 50% of current operating expenses for 1939; and (3)

the average amount given annually over the last three years to the Church's Program Fund.

The churches in the Diocese pledged for 1941 \$48,409.08 toward the tentative budget of \$55,248.97 for the Church's Program Fund.

During the past year the outstanding accomplishments in the field of Christian Education were the securing of Miss Jennie G. Trapier as Diocesan Director of Christian Education, and bringing near completion plans for securing a full-time chaplain for the some five hundred Episcopal students at Duke University.

In the field of Diocesan Missions the policy of placing resident clergymen in growing towns was continued by stationing Rev. Rufus J. Womble in Roxboro.

Under the direction of the Field Department two conferences were held in the fall, one for the clergy and another for the laity, in preparation for the annual every member canvass.

At the suggestion of the Department of Christian Social Relations the Council recommended to the Executive Committee of the Thompson Orphanage that the Orphanage be opened to five refugee children from Europe.

FOR ACTION

The Executive Council recommends to the Diocesan Convention that the assessments of missions for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund for 1942 be increased by an amount not exceeding the premium on the fire insurance protecting the mission property, at the discretion of the Executive Council. This will be reported for action by the Committee on Canons to whom it was referred.

The Executive Council has also requested the Committee on Canons to delineate the relationship of parochial missions to the Diocese.

Budgets for both the Episcopal Maintenance and the Church's Program Funds for 1942 will be proposed by the Executive Council through its Finance Department at the time set by the Convention.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

To the Diocesan Convention at Burlington, N. C., May 6-7, 1941, A.D.

During the year the Trustees held eleven meetings in the office of the Security National Bank, Raleigh, N. C., and thirteen meetings elsewhere to consider matters relative to the Diocesan affairs and Trust Funds and the Francis J. Murdoch Memorial Fund. Detailed action of the Trustees shown in Exhibit A hereto annexed; and the Accounts of the Trustees (including the Murdoch Memorial Fund) shown in Exhibit B hereto annexed. The detailed Audit of these accounts by Wm. M. Russ & Company is a part of Exhibit B.

In the Diocesan Account principal transactions involving the investment of \$25,953.20 were handled. Total investments for the period were divided as follows:

In the Murdoch Memorial Account principal transactions involving the investment of \$4,095.75 were handled. Total investments for the period were divided as follows:

All stocks and bonds held in both of the accounts have been carefully reviewed from time to time. No bonds held are in default and all stocks are on a dividend paying basis. Mortgages and other real estate notes are supported by Attorneys certificates of title and adequate fire insurance is carried by the borrowers to protect our loans. Real Estate loans do not exceed 40% of the conservative appraised value of the property. As of January 15, 1941, no real estate loan was in default as to either principal or interest.

The following additions were made to Trust Funds:

Alexander B. Andrews Trust. On July 17, 1940, Mr. Andrews pledged to the Diocese as an addition to the Trust Fund which he has established the sum of \$10,000.00, payable \$1,000.00 annually with interest on deferred balances at 4%. The pledge increased the principal of the Alexander B. Andrews Trust to \$25,000.00.

Bishop's Discretionary Account. On February 6, 1940 the Girls Friendly Society conveyed to the Trustees of the Diocese for the Discretionary use of the Bishop a dwelling located at 125 Halifax Street in the City of Raleigh. The property has an assessed value of \$8,500.00. At the same time, the Society paid over to the Trustees cash in the amount of \$1,521.26, and delivered other miscellaneous assets. This matter was also referred to in last year's report, which see.

The Reserve Fund, heretofore established to provide for bond amortization and possible investment losses, amounted to \$362.59 as of January 15. Payments to this fund, equal 5% of the gross income from investments, plus actual pro rata earnings on the funds invested amounted to \$166.13 for the year.

Total Funds in the Diocesan Control Account actually invested or held for investment increased from \$59,141.76 on January 15, 1940 to \$65,354.87 on January 15, 1941. Gross yield on investments, after providing for the reserve, was 4.589%. Net yield after all expense was 4.36%.

The following Diocesan properties were sold:

1. St. Jude's Church lot, Spring Hope, N. C., to Builders Supply Company for the sum of \$350.00.

2. Dwellings rear of E. H. Butler Home, Pittsboro, N. C., to Jim Moore and wife for the sum of \$300.00.

No arbitrators have been found to hear the claim of Mr. Kittrell against the Ladies Aid Society Funds of Kittrell, N. C.

The trustees of the Diocese have been advised by the Chancellor of the Diocese that they should resign as Trustees under the General Wm. A. Smith Will, as the Trusts thereby created are purely local and the school thereby authorized is for the benefit of the neighborhood of Ansonville Township, Anson County, N. C., and in no way connected with work of the Diocese of North Carolina. One of your Trustees has long been of the same opinion and the Trustees would like for a Committee to be appointed to advise them relative thereto.

Mr. Purrington is absent from the State, serving as an officer in the 113th Field Artillery, so this report is made and signed by the two remaining Trustees.

Attached to Report of Trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina submitted to the Diocesan Convention at Burlington May 6 and 7, 1941, A.D., showing details of action by Trustees:

1940

January 22—Authorized a first mortgage loan to Mrs. Eleanor Mann Connor of \$10,000.00 at 4¾% due March 31, 1944 and secured by realty at corner of New Bern Avenue and Wilmington Street, Raleigh, N. C.

March 8—Approved contract with Armstrong Tree Service Company to trim, etc. trees on Ravenscroft property.

March 16—Endorsed to Thompson Orphanage, Charlotte, N. C., eight cheques of Aetna Fire and other insurance companies, totaling \$91.95 for a fire loss. The Trustees think that the Orphanage insurance should be in its own name.

March 20—Authorized purchase from Beula Thorpe Jones of \$2,000.00 N. C. Highway 4% Bonds due 7-1-40 @ \$100.70 and interest.

April 1—Executed and delivered deed for St. Paul's Church, Wilkesboro, N. C., to the Wardens and Vestry of said Church, which is in the Diocese of Western North Carolina. Title in your Trustees since 1849 and failure to convey heretofore an oversight.

April 5—Authorized purchase of 13 shares of "B" Common stock of Liggett & Myers Tobacco Company @ 108 $\frac{3}{8}$ %.

May 9—Authorized loan to Ayden Furniture Works, Inc. of \$1500.00, payable \$750.00 per year, at 6% interest, secured by first Deed of Trust on property in Cary Township, Wake County, N. C.

June—Employed Clarkson & Taliaferro, Attorneys, and brought suit, as peremptorily directed by this Convention for the purpose of having the Court authorize the present expenditure of the monies and properties left for a school in Ansonville Township, Anson County, by will of late General William A. Smith. The suit was handled as well as possible but lost. See Penick et als v. Bank of Wadesboro, etc. 218 N. C. p. 686, 12 S.E. 2nd Series p. 253. Messrs. Clarkson and Taliaferro declined to take a fee from the Trustees of Diocese. The Trustees thereupon petitioned the Court for an allowance to their attorneys, and the Court directed a fee of \$500.00 for our attorneys to be paid out of the income of the Trust presently going to the local Trustees for the School.

June 28—Gave permission to George C. Pollard to sell for not less than \$400.00 (or each half for \$200.00) lot in Louisburg, N. C., of about an acre—proceeds to be used to repair St. Matthias Mission and School.

July 5—Received a gift of \$500.00 from American Church Building Fund Commission for Holy Hope Mission, Rocky Mount, N. C., and executed an agreement to refund same should the property not be used for Church purposes.

July 16—Executed and delivered to Reverend William J. Gordon, Spray, N. C., Deed to Wardens and Vestry of St. Luke's, Spray, for said Church property, as it is now a Parish.

July 18—Trustees called personally on Mr. Alexander B. Andrews and thanked him for an additional gift of \$10,000.00 to the Alexander B. Andrews Trust Fund of the Diocese of North Carolina.

July 18—Approved a loan of \$5,000.00 to John W. Lancaster at 6% payable in six years by installments, and secured by first Deed of Trust on eight houses and lots in Raleigh, N. C.

July 18—Approved purchase of seven shares of "B" Common stock of Liggett & Myers Tobacco Company.

July 18—Authorized purchase for Murdoch Memorial Fund of ten shares "B" Common stock of Liggett & Myers Tobacco Company.

July 18—The Bishop stated that in order to build up the Murdoch Memorial Fund, it is his purpose in the future to limit his uses of the income of same to 75%, so that the remaining 25% of income may be invested corpus.

August 5—With written consent of Mrs. William A. Smith, received \$600.00 from Executor of General William A. Smith and placed same to credit of Trustees and passed it on to local trustees for benefit of the Ansonville Township School.

August 20—Wake County assessed for taxation the following Diocesan properties in Raleigh, N. C., which are at present rented:

125 Halifax Street	8,500.00

September 16—Executed a Deed of Trust on Christ Church, Albemarle, N. C., to secure a \$5,000.00 note payable to D. A. Holbrook as part payment for the construction of said Church. This note is signed by certain members of said Church, and it is NOT signed by your Trustees.

September 20—Authorized the purchase for the Diocese of a Note and Deed of Trust of Ben Silk et uxor from St. Agnes Hospital at \$1350.00 and interest, secured by first deed of trust on seven room dwelling in Raleigh, N. C.

September 28—Approved expenditures from income of Alexander B. Andrews Trust: \$125.00 to repair St. Paul's Rectory, Smithfield; \$200.00 to repair St. Matthias Mission and School, Louisburg, N. C., to be repaid from sale of a lot above authorized.

September 28—Gave a thirty day option on lot formerly occupied by Spring Hope Church (now removed to Rocky Mount for Holy Hope Mission) to M. V. Parrish for Builders Supply Company.

October 4—Approved purchase of gas hot water heater for Ravenscroft at \$91.00.

October 19—Signed release of bond with Fidelity & Deposit Company of Maryland of Robert B. Coit, formerly Diocesan Treasurer of Church Pension Fund.

October 31—Approved loan of \$2500.00 to Y. D. Stewart at 6%, payable \$500.00 one year and \$200.00 annually for three years, and balance in five years, secured by first deed of trust on 63 acres of land about four miles East of Raleigh.

November 22—Approved expenditures of income from A. B. Andrews Trust Fund: \$100.00 for Parish House, Walnut Cove; \$25.00 for Parish House, Ascension Church, Davie County.

December 9—\$150.00 for paving due Town of Oxford by St. Cyprian's Church.

January 10—Approved purchase for Murdoch Memorial Fund of five shares Common stock American Telephone and Telegraph Company at market and any balance not over \$900.00 to be invested in General Motors \$5 preferred stock. Also authorized sale of L. & N. R. R. first and Refund 4½% Bond due 2003.

January 14—Petitioned court to allow a fee to our Attorneys in Smith Will case as above reported and \$500.00 allowed against income of Smith Trust as stated. *See above.*

REPORT OF THE HISTORIOGRAPHER

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

Since the last Convention my life of Bishop Joseph Blount Cheshire has been published by the University of North Carolina Press.

In addition to putting this work in final form for publication, I have completed the research for a history of old St. John's Parish, Williamsboro. St. John's church is the only colonial church standing today in the Diocese of North Carolina. It is, therefore, fitting that some permanent record of its history and its part in the development of the Diocese should be made. It is earnestly hoped that funds can be raised to restore this venerable building before it is beyond repair.

REPORT OF CHANCELLOR

The matters that have come before the Chancellor during the past year, have been very few and were principally inquiries as to how the law of the state affected the property held for the church and what were church rights and duties in the matters.

June 18, 1940. Advised the Rector of a Parish, without giving a ruling, that in my judgment Canon 57, Section 5, providing for the election of an Assistant Minister under certain cases applied to temporary assistants as well as a permanent case, and therefore the engaging of an assistant minister would have to come through the vestry itself, as the Rector alone could not take such action.

July 10, 1940. Advised the Rector of the Parish that the Trustees of the congregation, of which he was Rector, who held the title to the church, could as individuals be appointed by the Clerk of the Court as guardian for minor children, but that church trustees were only authorized to hold for church property, and in my opinion the law did not consider that church trustees, as such trustees in a corporate body, had authority to hold property for the benefit of minor children.

August 8, 1940. Advised the Chancellor of another Diocese, whose Canons were similar to those of North Carolina, that in this writer's opinion, vacancies on the Executive Council should be filled by election by the Council itself, and not by appointment by the Bishop, as there was no provision in the Canon conferring that right on the Bishop.

On the other hand the members of the Council, like any other governing board of a business corporation, would have power to adopt by-laws for its regulations, could prescribe how vacancies should be filled, and act accordingly.

January 10, 1941. Advised Bishop that the papers presented showing the annulment of a marriage by the Civil Courts of another

state, by judgment filed therein upon personal service on the other party, who admitted the facts alleged in the complaint, praying for such civil annulment, on which the court held that the marriage was void under the statutes of that state "and should be annulled," which was so adjudged, and it authorized the Bishop, to so "declare the marriage annulled and void, for impediments existing prior to the annulled marriage" and on that he was justified in giving his consent to the marriage of the petitioner to another by a clergyman of this Diocese.

April 28, 1941. Orally advised the Bishop that a vestryman called into service under the draft act did not forfeit his office as vestryman, and concurred in the opinion that as vestryman should be active on the ground and accessible, and advise for the parish, that upon it being called to the attention of the vestryman so called into service, that he would doubtless resign his office, and give the opportunity for an active vestryman to be elected.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF SAINT MARY'S SCHOOL, INCORPORATED

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Incorporation the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith the report for the academic year 1940-41.

Since the Diocesan Conventions of 1940 the following meetings of the governing boards of Saint Mary's have been held:

April 2nd, 1940, Executive Committee

May 28th, 1940, Board Trustees—Annual Meeting

June 3rd, 1940, Executive Committee

June 14th, 1940, Executive Committee

June 17th, 1940, Committee on Sprinkler System

December 10th, 1940, Executive Committee

February 19th, 1941, Executive Committee

Important matters considered at these meetings include:

1st.—Approval of Reports of Officer's and Auditor's.

2nd.—Approval of Library expansion, Music Building Studio, Warehouse and Recreation Centre.

3rd.—The decision to install a Sprinkler System in Smedes, East and West Wings which was completed before the opening of school in September and has been in satisfactory service during the session. Supplementing this installation extensive changes in vestibules and stairways were necessary and have been completed. Approximate total cost \$12,000.00.

4th.—A full time Alumnae Secretary service was authorized and Miss Sarah Vann of Franklinton, North Carolina, is now employed in this position.

5th.—Landscaping of Grounds, tree planting, improvement of walks and roads.

6th.—Retirement Plan for Teachers.

7th.—The 1942 Centennial in connection with which a survey and report was authorized by Marts & Lundy of New York which is now available. Decision was approved to open the 1941-42 Centennial Session on September 1st that the School events may be held as part of the Commencement Exercises in Mid-May, 1942.

Since my last report the Rev. I. Wayne Hughes of Henderson, in place of Mr. Geo. C. Royal of Goldsboro, retired, has been elected to membership on the Board of Trustees for the Diocese of North Carolina.

The Rev. J. B. Gible, D.D., of Wilmington has died, leaving a vacancy in Board Members from the Diocese of East Carolina.

Donations:—Gift of Miss Florence Slater of Winston-Salem, N. C., a former Saint Mary's student and teacher, 24 shares of A. T. & T. stock for use of the Biological Department. (not yet available.)

The 1940-41 school session has been most satisfactory. We have a capacity registration of 225 Resident students and in addition 46 Day and Special Students, total 271. In this registration nineteen States are represented with 174 Students from North Carolina, 34 from Virginia, 14 from South Carolina and with from one to seven registrations from the other States. Religious affiliations are:—141 Episcopal, 51 Methodist, 39 Presbyterian, 28 Baptist, with one or two students from six other denominations.

As this report is written the applications of 166 students have been accepted for the 1941-42 session of whom 81 are coming to Saint Mary's for the first time and 85 returning students. Another capacity enrollment is indicated.

The Trustees welcome this means, however formal and inadequate, to express their sincere appreciation for the devotion and the professional skill with which the affairs of this institution have been administered in all of its departments during the past year.

A condensed financial statement of Assets and Liabilities of Trustees funds from the Auditor's report for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1940, is attached.

The records are available. Each rector has a copy of our Hand Book showing expenditures for 1940, reports of Diocesan Officers and information concerning objectives of our work. The proposed objectives for advance work indicate the wideness of our interest.

We have set for our keynote, "Witnessing through Service."

This is a challenge we accept as an opportunity to show forth our love and thankfulness.

Our numbers have increased. More and more we are able to enlist women in some department and our aim is to have every woman actively engaged in some phase of Christian activity. We report with satisfaction on the valuable work of our Diocesan Director of Christian Education, and of the Negro Social Worker, part of whose salaries we pay. We have the good news too that a nurse has arrived in Anvik, Alaska. This has been one of our objectives for several years. The Bishop has given to the Auxiliary President the privilege of serving on the Diocesan Committee of the "Forward in Service" program. We intend to lend our influence and strength toward promoting the plans outlined by the Presiding Bishop.

Altogether we can report that the Auxiliary is in a healthy condition. If gifts be an indication it is pertinent to say that they amounted to over \$29,000 last year.

REPORT OF THE LAYMEN'S LEAGUE

The Sixth Annual Convention of the Laymen's League of the Diocese of North Carolina was held in St. Andrew's Church, Greensboro, N. C., on Sunday, October 27, 1940, at which time new officers were elected as follows:

The meeting was well attended, and the League gave consideration at that time to possible projects for the Diocesan organization for the ensuing year, but action was referred to the Executive Committee.

Since the Convention there have been several informal meetings of the Executive Committee, at which time informal and unofficial discussion was had upon the possibilities of renewing interest in the Laymen's League throughout the Diocese. The first formal meeting

of this group was held in Greensboro on February 23, 1941, at which time it was decided to organize the Diocese into small districts, with a member of the Executive Committee as contact officer between local Chapter organization and the Diocesan organization. Accordingly, the Diocese has been divided into eleven districts, ten of these according to counties, and one Negro district covering the entire Diocese. Each of these districts has been allotted to a member of the Executive Committee for his personal supervision and efforts to revive League activity, and it is expected that some definite results will be forthcoming.

At this time the Executive Committee also decided to edit a regular column in the North Carolina Churchman, and Mr. Bertram Brown of Greensboro offered his services in this connection. The League will hereafter use this column for the publication of any items of interest to the men of the church, and also as an official organ for the dissemination of general information pertaining to League matters. In this the League has received the full and hearty cooperation of the Editors of the CAROLINA CHURCHMAN.

The Executive Committee further adopted at this time as a program for the ensuing year an effort to boost the attendance, and to more thoroughly familiarize the laymen of the Diocese with the activities of the church camps,—Vade Mecum and Camp Delany.

The Negro organization of the Laymen's League, under the guidance and supervision of Dr. Edson E. Blackman held its annual convention in Warrenton on March 30, 1941. This meeting was well attended, and enthusiastic support for Camp Delany for the ensuing year was assured. The Camp was highly successful in the summer of 1940 under the auspices of the Negro district.

The Laymen's League of the Diocese has, unfortunately, been rather dormant the last several years, with the exception of the active interest of a small and enthusiastic group. This group, however, has become more energetic in its activities, and more purposeful in an attempt to renew general interest among the laymen of the Diocese in the organization, and it is hoped and felt that there shall be a revival of interest in many of the local Chapters, most of which have been practically disbanded. We are, therefore, hoping that by the next General Convention the Laymen's League can report to you an encouraging increase in the fellowship and activities of the Laymen's League of the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE

To you through whose efforts the work at the Thompson Orphanage is made possible, we wish to present a brief survey of the costs of our operations and of the sources from which the money is obtained.

Our budget of annual living costs is now \$31,000.00. This is somewhat higher than for the last few years, though not as large as the time before the depression. The greater part of this increase is found in the salary schedule due to the following additions to the staff.

First, in line with other institutions of our kind, we now have a full-time case worker whose services assure us, through careful investigation, that the children whom we admit are in real need of our care; and that those whom we do not take can find that care with the family or some other type of assistance.

Then, we have added a general handy-man, the husband of one of our matrons, whose job is to look after the property, and with the help of the boys keep it in good repair. He is a carpenter and painter, and though it means an increase in our staff, it also means that less is spent for outside help. And it is in line with the policy that keeping property in constant repair is cheaper in the end. Our plant, valued at \$588,651.00 and praised by all who have surveyed it, is worth too much to allow its neglect and abuse.

And for the first time we have the salary of chaplain in addition to that of superintendent, since we do not have a resident clergyman.

Our other item of heavy proportions is that of food for the children, and this we are hoping to reduce with the products from our garden. We are already enjoying the spring vegetables, and are planning to can the surplus products during the summer. This garden, by the way, is not only a financial saving but provides a splendid work program for the boys.

The clothing of our children is generously carried by the Auxiliaries and by individuals, and their education is provided in the city schools.

Now, to meet expenses we have several sources of income. From the Duke Endowment we receive a little less than \$2,000.00 a year; from our own Endowment, about \$6,500.00. From County support or from parents, we receive about \$1,000.00 (which we hope to increase and which has already shown some increase through the efforts of our case worker). But the greater part of our income, about \$20,000.00, or 2/3 of the whole, must come from the churches, either from the Thanksgiving offering, from the diocesan budget, or from individual or church contributions throughout the year.

During the year 1940 the Orphanage cared for 95 children. Of this number 19 were placed—1 at college, 5 in Business school, 1 in nursing school, 7 with relatives, 1 in a private home, and 5 are self-supporting. There are 80 in the Orphanage at present; 7 of these

will graduate in June. One is preparing to enter nursing school, 1 is preparing to take training for a Laboratory Technician and 5 are going to work.

Our most generous friend, Dr. W. Myers Hunter, who has so generously donated his services for the past 43 years, reports that the health of the children as usual has been remarkably good, and above the average.

A work and training program has been put into effect which includes all our children. This work is closely supervised and rewarded according to the job done. If a child does not do a good job, then some privilege is denied this child. Each child is required to do a certain amount of work for the institution each day. As a result of this program many improvements to the grounds and buildings have been made. At the present we have an 8 acre garden. Growing in the garden are green beans, corn, tomatoes, May peas, onions, cabbage, okra, beets, carrots, cucumbers, squash, pepper and an assortment of greens. Some of this we are using now. The other will be used in season. The boys have done all of this work except the ploughing. The girls do the laundry work, mend, cook, and sew.

We believe that the last year has been a good one. Our job of selecting the most worthy children and of finding places for those who have graduated has been done much better because of the help of our trained case-worker. The children are responding well to our new work and training program. The Board of Managers and our various committees are capable and interested.

There are eighty fine children looking to us for support and encouragement. I pledge my best effort to this task and know I can count on your support.

REPORT OF ST. AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE

(including St. Agnes Hospital and Bishop Tuttle Training School)

During the past year 302 students have been enrolled in the Institution. Of this number 235 were enrolled in the regular College course. The students represent 22 states and the District of Columbia. About 50% come from North Carolina—about 25% from other states in the South and about 25% from other parts of the United States.

St. Augustine's is definitely a Church institution in its control, personnel and objectives. About one half of the student body and three-fourths of the faculty and staff are Communicants. Active Church work is carried on both on the campus and in the community. Week day and Sunday services in the beautiful College Chapel are a regular and integral part of the college program. Among the Church organizations that are functioning on the campus are the Woman's

Auxiliary—both Junior and Senior branches—the Laymen's League, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew and the Altar Guild. Each year a confirmation class is presented to the Bishop. Students are helpful in holding services at St. Agnes Hospital and in visiting in the neighborhood, in the County Home and in nearby Prison Camps. The congregational Lenten offering for Missions, presented on Easter Day, was about \$335.

Under the auspices of the Fellowship of Religious Workers in Negro Colleges a faculty and student three day conference was held jointly at St. Augustine's College and Shaw University. About 100 delegates were present from various parts of the country. A youth conference held at St. Augustine's in connection with the Negro work of the Diocese was led by Miss Emily Wilson, National Secretary of the United Youth Movement of our Church. In June there will be again held the Annual St. Augustine's Conference for Clergy and Church Workers including a Conference for Young People.

The State Public Welfare Institute for Negro Workers continues to meet at St. Augustine's, as does the Crown and Scepter Honorary Scholarship Society, an organization founded and sponsored by the College. There will also be held a regional meeting of Girl Scouts and the Negro District Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

As an educational Institution of the Church, St. Augustine's is part of the system of schools affiliated with and aided by the American Church Institute for Negroes. In this system of eight schools it has a definite place as the Institution chosen because of its tradition and equipment to offer the standard work usually associated with a Liberal Arts College. Other schools of the Church are designated for other types of training. In accordance with this selective purpose St. Augustine's offers certain types of instruction and refrains from offering other types, thus seeking to avoid duplication of effort and to insure more effective work in what is undertaken. At present our efforts are being directed toward securing an additional annual income of \$10,000, which we need in order to receive the highest rating from the Southern Association of Colleges. The future usefulness of the Institution will be materially affected by the result of this effort.

We are still enjoying the advantage of an interchange of students in certain courses with Shaw University and through the aid of the General Education Board share with Shaw in employing a joint Professor of English.

It is also gratifying to note that members of the family of the late Bishop Delany have established a scholarship fund in his memory.

Since our last report the Rev. Dr. Robert W. Patton has retired after serving zealously for over twenty-five years as Director of the American Church Institute for Negroes and has been succeeded by his associate the Rev. Cyril E. Bentley, who has already shown keen interest in the work at St. Augustine's.

ST. AGNES' HOSPITAL

During the past year St. Agnes Hospital with its Training School of about 35 nurses continued its large and useful work. From May 1, 1940 to May 1, 1941 there were 25,926 hospital days, 1665 bed patients, 2,149 clinic patients, 3,891 outpatient visits, and 972 operations. About 75% of the work is done without charge. The State Division for Crippled Children sends many patients to the hospital and there has been an Eye Clinic in connection with the work of the State Commission for the Blind. Members of the Hospital Staff have also helped in connection with the physical examinations of men summoned under the Selective Service Act. A trained Social Worker, a graduate of the Bishop Tuttle School, has continued to visit the patients and to do follow up work with them. She has also stimulated the Hospital Auxiliary which she helped to organize and has kept in contact with various community agencies.

The physical plant of the hospital is badly in need of renovation and enlargement in order to offer adequate and modern facilities for the care of the patients. An expert in hospital architecture has drawn up preliminary plans and estimates calling for an expenditure of \$125,000 in order to meet this situation. The Trustees plan to continue their efforts to enlist the aid of Charitable Foundations and Church organizations and individuals. The National Council has recently given its endorsement to this effort. We trust that in due time it will be successful.

THE BISHOP TUTTLE SCHOOL

This school was established and is maintained as a special project of the National Woman's Auxiliary. Its primary aim is to train young women in Religious Education and Social Work. Connected with it is the Tuttle Community Center which is doing a large and important work in the neighborhood. During the past year the school has profited by the services of Miss Louise Rich, formerly Secretary for Religious Education in the Diocese of New York. A recent graduate, Mrs. Fannie Gross, is serving as a field worker for the Woman's Auxiliary and is rendering excellent service. There have been over sixty graduates from the school since its founding in 1925.

In conclusion I would repeat the often expressed hope that increased support be given to the work at St. Augustine's from this Diocese and other parts of North Carolina. It would be a fair and right thing to do and would greatly encourage those who are engaged in the work.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

Your Committee on the State of the Church respectfully submits the following report:

Infant baptisms during the year 1940 were 412. This is an increase of 7 over the previous year.

Adult baptisms were 117 which is a decrease of 39.

Confirmations show a gain of 53 for 1940. The total is 714.

In 1940 there were reported 13,428 communicants, which is an increase of 250 over 1939.

Registrations for church schools show 860 officers and teachers, 5,836 pupils, and 1,347 adults in Bible classes. There are five more officers and teachers, 134 more pupils, and 94 fewer adults in Bible classes. Enrollment in adult Bible classes has decreased for the last three years.

According to figures given by Mr. Alexander B. Andrews, the population of the State of North Carolina has increased 12% during the last decade, whereas the population of the Church has increased 25%.

From the report of the Committee on the State of the Church for 1940 we quote, "In looking over the Journals of the Diocese for the past ten years we discover the fact that no missionary clergyman has been elected to the Executive Council, the Standing Committee, as a delegate to the General Convention, nor, with the exception of one, to the Provincial Synod. Of the twenty-two elections to the Executive Council, 18 have been from the larger parishes, three from smaller parishes, and one from a large church in a college community. Of the Standing Committee, all have been from the larger parishes, the same being true of delegates to the General Convention. Of the Laymen, your committee was unable to place all of them, but the overwhelming majority was shown to have come from the larger churches. This means that Diocesan policy has been formulated by clergymen and laymen most familiar with the parochial problems of the larger parishes. It is true that practically all of our parochial clergymen are engaged in mission work, but there is an enormous difference between such part time and full time work."

After this report there were four clergymen elected as deputies to the General Convention. Three were from the larger churches and one from the smaller churches.

Your committee feels that since the proposed budget for 1942 contains amounts for expenses of delegates to the Provincial Synod and the General Convention, a definite form of representation at these meetings should be followed. Most of the churches of the diocese are small parishes or missions, and your committee feels that at least two clergymen and two laymen from the small parishes and missions should be elected to represent this diocese at the Provincial Synod, and at least one clergyman and one layman from the small

parishes and missions be elected to represent the diocese at the General Convention.

In defining a small parish or mission your committee suggests that any parish or mission having two hundred or less communicants be considered a small parish or mission.

Further, we suggest that one clerical and one lay delegate, both to the Provincial Synod and to the General Convention, shall be persons who have not previously attended the Synod or Convention.

Your committee feels that the adoption of these suggestions will tend to make our delegations at the Synod and Convention more truly representative of the Diocese as a whole.

In another forward moving step your committee heartily recommends the adoption by this convention of our Bishop's Forward In Service objectives.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON ASSISTANCE TO THE BISHOP

To The Bishop and Members of the 125th Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

The Special Committee on Assistance to the Bishop begs leave to report as follows:

After considerable discussion the Convention of 1939 passed the following resolution, "Resolved that the Executive Council continue its study and make further plans for the consolidation of such Diocesan offices as seem advisable, and for the creation of a Diocesan office in Raleigh, and to consider the whole matter of bringing about greater efficiency, economy, and better business management in the administration of the affairs of the Diocese and convention and to report at the 124th Convention."

The Executive Council reported to the 1940 Convention and action taken as follows: (1) The collection of Church Pension Fund assessments were assigned direct to the New York office, and Diocesan collections were eliminated. (2) The Security National Bank of Raleigh was elected as Treasurer of both the Church's Program Fund and the Episcopal Maintenance Fund. Both of the preceding were adopted by the Convention. (3) The Executive Council further proposed that an Executive Secretary for the Diocese be elected in 1941, with its reasons for such action.

The resolution in regard to the foregoing was amended twice, and after full discussion, a substitute was adopted as follows: "Resolved: That the question of the Executive Secretaryship be referred to a special committee of five to study this question or other means of assistance to the administrative head of the Diocese, and report to the 1941 Convention."

Pursuant to this order the Bishop appointed the Rev. William S. Turner, the Rev. David W. Yates, the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence, Mr. John H. Cutter, and Mr. Kemp D. Battle.

The Committee, since the Bishop hitherto had unfavorably considered all plans for such administrative assistance asked for the Bishop's frank desires in regard to the matter. His answer is as follows:

"I am grateful for your willingness to propose any plan for assistance to the administrative head of the diocese that I might suggest. However, to be perfectly frank, I do not feel that I have the right under present circumstances to ask the diocese for any form of assistance that would involve an increase in our maintenance budget. When the Reverend Elwood L. Haines was Executive Secretary in 1928-32, his office cost the diocese \$6600 per annum. As I recall, this expense was justified when the office was created by anticipated additional sources of revenue which the new office would discover. I do not believe that this was actually the case, although Mr. Haines was highly efficient and most acceptable. To recreate the office would

be exceedingly burdensome, I think, to the diocese, and under existing conditions would hardly be warranted. I do not care at this time to ask for either a suffragan or a bishop coadjutor, or even archdeacons, unless the sentiment of the Convention should demand it. Naturally, I am jealous for the diocese to be administered at a maximum degree of efficiency, and if the Convention is of the opinion that that standard is not being maintained, and their opinion can be substantiated by facts, I shall of course be advised by the Convention's wishes.

Working on the assumption that the administration of the diocese would not engage any additional officers, I have tried to substitute therefor a plan that is increasing in effectiveness year by year, namely, to delegate as much freedom and authority as possible to the chairmen of the several departments of the Executive Council. This plan, under the excellent chairmanships that the Council has furnished, seems to me to have resulted in an efficient program of work and also in the development of splendid leadership both in our clergy and laity. It is my purpose, unless the Convention's wishes should be otherwise, to continue this policy."

The Bishop in the above has set forth the three essential factors to be considered in this matter of assistance in the Diocese: (1) the expense of the office, (2) the opinion of the Convention, and (3) the functioning of the Executive Council.

(1) In considering the item of additional expense which would be added to the maintenance budget (in the case of the Executive Secretary an estimated \$4800.00 per annum) we must also consider the whole question of Diocesan income. In looking over the Journals of the past seven years it is an unhappy fact that each year the Church's Program Fund Budget as set by the Executive Council and Convention has failed to be raised by \$4000 to \$12,000. For the current year there is approximately \$6000.00 difference between the proposed budget and actual pledges for 1941. The large and long continuing gap between proposed performance and actual performance is cause for concern, for study, and for remedy. There has apparently been no such condition in the Episcopal Maintenance Fund, for it would seem that each year budget expectations and actual income have been substantially the same with a favorable balance left over.

It seems to the committee, therefore, that the Diocese is able and willing to support the administrative office of the Church, but is unwilling to fully support the Missionary Program. This raises a very real question and the causes should be gone into and remedial suggestions made and carried out. We offer no resolution in this regard, but merely bring it to the attention of the Convention. For surely it cannot be said that the Diocesan giving is anywhere nearly approaching its ability to finance the greatly needed work to which it is committed under God.

(2) In considering item 2, regarding the sentiment of the Convention, it must be borne in mind that many members of the Convention have for years been of the opinion that the Bishop should not have the sole responsibility of administering so large a Diocese. This sentiment was and is solely due to the affectionate regard for the Bishop, concern for his well being under the arduous task imposed upon him by his Episcopal office, and a sincere desire to lighten the task as much as possible by giving him such assistance as was deemed advisable.

It is well to note that the Convention as a body has never had the opportunity of officially expressing its sentiment in this matter for many years, for the only resolutions ever voted upon by the Convention have been to appoint committees to report to the succeeding Convention.

The issue cannot be decided upon whether or not the Convention thinks that the standard of a maximum degree of efficiency is being maintained in the administration of the Diocese, for in the Diocese of North Carolina we are blessed with an outstanding and one of the ablest, most far-visioned, constructive and beloved Bishops in the American Episcopate. The desire to give assistance is a definite gesture of affectionate confidence and done in the spirit of helpfulness.

But this brings us to an impasse. The Bishop has expressed himself as being opposed to any plan for administrative assistance, and the Convention naturally hesitates to give expression, that the Bishop should be given assistance.

In order to clarify the situation and have a record of the definite opinion and action, the committee offers the resolutions at the close of this report.

(3) In considering item 3, the functioning of the Executive Council, we must remember that all members of the Council are busy men and women with full responsibilities apart from their membership on the Executive Council. The members have always given generously of their time and talents to the increasing responsibilities imposed upon them by Convention and Council, but all this must be done in addition to their already existing tasks.

Some criticism has been directed at the Council under its present organizations and many suggestions offered. These suggestions run from the centralization of authority into the hands of the heads of Council departments, to the decentralization of authority, or rather cooperative authority, by the setting up of four convocations within the Diocese with a Dean and small council in each such convocation to nominate members to and cooperate with the Bishop and Executive Council. There is much of virtue in these suggestions which should be taken in consideration.

We must also bear in mind that in this whole Diocese there is not one full time officer save the Bishop. Every large Parish has at least

one full time member on its staff in addition to the Rector. This Diocese has in the past and during the same period had the following staff: Bishop, Coadjutor Bishop, Suffragan Bishop, Executive Secretary or Archdeacons. Surely the task is no less now than when it took such a large staff to accomplish it.

In view of the foregoing, the special committee asks the adoption of this report and the adoption of the following resolutions by the Convention, and asks that it be discharged from further consideration of the matter:

(1) Resolved: That the wishes of the Bishop be followed in that assistance to the Bishop be not offered at this Convention.

(2) Resolved: That the Convention assure the Bishop that if and when he desires administrative assistance, the Convention will do all in its power to see that such assistance is provided.

REPORT OF THE DEAF MISSION

I respectfully submit the following as the report of my official work for the year covering May 1, 1940 to May 1, 1941.

I have delivered 181 sermons and addresses. I have baptized two infants and six adults; have performed one marriage and two funerals.

I have presented eight candidates for Confirmation in the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington.

There are two Churches for the use of the deaf people in our Diocese. They are Ephphatha Church, Durham, and St. Athanasius Church, Burlington. In other Dioceses in the United States, the deaf people have access to one Church only.

I have two licensed Lay Readers in Winston-Salem. They conduct services every week in St. Paul's parish. I am going to have more Lay Readers soon for the other Stations where I hold services.

During the period mentioned above, I officiated in the following places: Durham, Raleigh, Burlington, Greensboro, Winston-Salem, Kannapolis, Charlotte, High Point, and at the North Carolina School for the Deaf, Morganton.

Outside of Ephphatha parish I have preached to more than fifteen hundred deaf people and ministered to them in other ways. Besides our religious services, we have our social gatherings in the parish houses. Our people are happy and contented, and all are satisfied that the Churches have brought so much joy and blessing into their lives.

I wish to take the opportunity on behalf of the deaf people everywhere to thank our Beloved Bishop, the Clergy of the Diocese and laymen and laywomen who have shown their interest and extended their help in this work.

ANNUAL REPORT OF VADE MECUM CAMPS AND CONFERENCES

TO THE DIOCESAN CONVENTION

The 1940 Schedule—

Twelve camps and conferences were included in the schedule from June 1st through September 1st as follows: The Y. P. S. L. Convention, School of Teacher Training, Daily Vacation Bible Training School, College Girls Conference, Camp Cheshire Senior, Camp Cheshire Junior, Camp Tise, Woman's Auxiliary Conference, Laymen's League Conference, Camp Penick Senior, Camp Penick Junior, Counselor-President Conference (cancelled), and the Y. P. S. L. Executive Committee Meeting. This program offered an opportunity for every one in the Diocese over 10 years of age.

Attendance—

The only Conference with capacity registration was the Y. P. S. L. Convention. Camp Tise lacked two of having capacity attendance. The total attendance for the summer including all paid registrations and the faculty and staff of each camp was 549 persons. Our goal for 1941 is 800 paid registrations.

Personnel and Management—

As in the past every effort was made to secure the best leaders available for the different camps and conferences. Every leader was selected on the basis of Christian character, personality, training and experience. The staff of each camp or conference was in residence only for the duration of that camp and conference. A permanent staff consisting of Business Manager, Office Secretary, Registered Graduate Nurse, Dietitian, three cooks, four camp assistants, one of whom is Red Cross Life Saving Examiner, and night watchman. This staff was supplemented from time to time by waitresses for the adult conferences, and by a part time secretary before camp opened. The Vade Mecum Farm is operated by the full time Caretaker and two tenants.

Camp certificates of achievement—

In 1940 for the first time special pocket cards were awarded to each camper who completed the work of each course he studied. In all more than five hundred cards were awarded. An individual record of each camper's work is on file at Vade Mecum. In 1941 to every camper who completes four courses (in two years) a wall certificate signed by the Chairman of the Department of Christian Education and the Bishop of the Diocese will be awarded.

The Building Program (to date May 5, 1941)—

All ten cabins have been completed, each equipped with bathroom with hot and cold running water and shower. Our camp capacity is now increased to eighty campers. Each cabin will accommodate eight campers and a counselor.

The Cheshire Hall Lobby was redecorated and made attractive with wood paneling. The office and store spread out to a room each, a library was equipped in the lobby ante-room, two class rooms, one of which serves as a small chapel were also equipped.

Two rooms and a hallway were added to the caretakers cottage. One room serves as Post Office, the other is a bathroom fully equipped. All new construction, excepting the cabins, was paid for from the Tise Trust Fund.

New Equipment and Repairs—

The Duke Power Company donated a large kitchen range with two ovens and eight cooking eyes. Eight double decker cots and sixteen mattresses were purchased in one order. On another occasion a number of single three quarter, and double mattresses were purchased for old beds renovated and now erected on the third floor of the

hotel. Four new lobby chairs, twenty-four new straight chairs were purchased, and about twenty old broken chairs were repaired and renovated. An outdoor light and two swimming pool flood lights were installed. Many repairs such as painting and replacement of plumbing fixtures were made.

The cost of this new but necessary equipment was about equal to the amount of the deficit incurred last year.

Diocesan cooperation—

As a result of the plea made last year many Parishes have included scholarships in their budgets for 1941, and many more branches of the Woman's Auxiliary are providing funds for their boys and girls. I commend their action, and urge all Churches in the Diocese to do likewise. It takes the full cooperation of every Church in the Diocese to make Vade Mecum solvent, since all cost of operation and maintenance must be equalled by registration and camp fees.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON COLLEGE WORK

College work in the diocese becomes more and more important each year, as the number of Episcopal students on our campuses continues to increase. There are now about 1500 Episcopalians in the four large colleges of the diocese, and the number in the smaller colleges would probably bring the total to over 2000. Obviously the need for work among this number is great.

At Duke and State College, in addition to the pastoral work and regular Church services and meetings, a monthly celebration of the Holy Communion is held on the campus and attendance has been good. At both of these colleges, it is felt that as much as can be done without a full-time student worker is being done. Plans for employing such a worker at Duke are nearly completed, and it is hoped that they can be put into effect for the next college year.

The work at Chapel Hill and at the Woman's College has gone on this year as usual, and it is felt that some progress has been made.

The student workers at these colleges fill a very necessary part in the Church's program, and also assist in various inter-church activities. Efforts were inaugurated this year to provide some definite program for the Episcopal students at Wake Forest College, and it is hoped that these will continue.

The regular diocesan Student Conference was held in February at Greensboro, and was successful despite the damage which had been done by a fire at St. Mary's House a few days before the conference met. Representatives of the diocese were also present at a Provincial conference on Women's Vocations, held in January in Tuscaloosa. Episcopal students also took part in an Interdenominational Student Conference at Greensboro in December, and the college workers met with workers of other denominations at St. Augustine's College in February for a one-day conference.

Those in college work can see very clearly the necessity for more careful training of boys and girls in their home parishes. Those active in the Church's work at college are almost always those who have been well based in the Faith before coming to college. Therefore, everyone can assist in our college work by seeing that, in each parish, there is an adequate and well-planned instruction of the young people in the teachings of the Church. Boys and girls are faced with the necessity of learning many new things at college, and they will be better adjusted for this if, before they come, they already know what Christianity is all about. Only if this is so can the Christian faith be, in their minds, something far greater and more important than these other new things which assume such importance in college life.

REPORT ON KANUGA CONFERENCE
TO THE DIOCESAN CONVENTION

May 6, 1941

The Kanuga Conferences were organized in 1929 with four dioceses, Western North Carolina, East Carolina, South Carolina and Upper South Carolina participating. From the first both young people and adults from this diocese have been prominent at these conferences in both numbers and leadership, but it was not until the Convention held in Tarboro in 1938 that we assumed our share of the responsibility for the successful conduct of this great and well known church agency. The untimely death of Bishop Finlay and more recently the removal of Bishop Jackson to Louisiana now call for close cooperation and constructive loyalty from us all.

Kanuga last summer added another successful term to its record, successful at least in the accomplishment of its objectives of increasing the knowledge and love of God in the minds and hearts of those members and children of the church who come under its influence.

The usual camps and conferences maintained their average attendance and the staff of teachers and officers measured up to the high standard set in the days of Bishop Finlay. In other words, under the guidance of Bishop Gribbin, President of the Board; Rev. A. Rufus Morgan, General Manager; and Bishop John Long Jackson, this fine educational institution maintained its well known traditions.

As for the financial success of Kanuga, that is probably less certain and since we, even in the church, still gauge success by the balanced ledger, a few words about this secondary yet still important consideration may be in order.

The accounts of Kanuga Lake for 1940 were carefully compiled by an expert bookkeeper, Mr. F. D. McLean, and were presented by the January 1941 meeting of the Board. The prepared statement showed assets in land, buildings, dam, water supply, furniture and fixtures, and miscellaneous items of \$263,439, while against this are liabilities of notes and a mortgage amounting to \$23,537. This, of course, means that not only do the conferences have to pay their own way and maintain this valuable property, but they must pay annual interest charges amounting to some \$1400. Is it any wonder that the prospect of freeing Kanuga of debt so that the beautiful new Chapel of the Transfiguration can be consecrated seems somewhat remote? If we were more truly interested in the Christian education of our children, not only would institutions like Kanuga and Wade Mecum be more cheerfully and adequately supported, but also our church schools, which many parents seem to think can impart all necessary instruction and training for a nickel a week, would be given more time and money for their important work.

Your clerical and lay trustees attended both the summer and

winter meetings of the Board. The next meeting will be held at Kanuga July 22. The usual camps and conferences are all organized, the adult conference again, and perhaps for the last time, under the guidance of Bishop Jackson. Rev. A. Rufus Morgan, for so many years associated with Bishop Finlay at Kanuga and now living at Franklin, North Carolina, is still in charge of the property as Superintendent and Treasurer.

All chapel offerings during the summer are to go towards cancelling a debt of \$700 on the pews which were made from timber grown on the place. The clergy conference begins July 15 and the adult or teacher-training conference will start July 12.

Your earnest support and active interest are needed for this as well as for all the other educational work of our church.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FAITH AND ORDER

The Commission on Faith and Order wishes to submit to the Convention the following report:

The report is in three parts: first, a statement informing the diocese of the action of the General Convention; second, a report of the activities of the North Carolina Council of Church; third, a report of the activities of the Committee on Faith and Order.

I.

The General Convention accepted an invitation to become a member of the World Council of Churches.

The General Convention agreed to the establishment of intercommunion between the Protestant Episcopal Church and the Old Catholic Churches which are in communion with the See of Utrecht.

The General Convention joined the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

The General Convention passed a very significant resolution in reference to Church Unity with the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. and other Christian Communions, which we quote as follows:

“Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring in view of the Declaration of purpose of this Church and the Presbyterian Church of the U. S. A. to achieve organic union, and of the progress of negotiations to that end, this Convention advises those members of this Church so situated that the ministrations of this Church are not accessible to associate themselves with a Presbyterian congregation where possible, in worship and service, so far as consistent with their continued membership in this Church, and commends such persons to the pastoral care of the Presbyterian ministers of such congregation.

“Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, that the General

Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church rejoices in the evident better understanding between this Church and other Christian bodies, especially the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., and expressed its sincere hope that there may be, in the near future, ever increasingly close approach to unity with our separated brethren, with ultimate organic unity, not only with the Presbyterian Church but with others also."

The General Convention reaffirmed its adherence to the Declaration of purpose to achieve organic union with the Presbyterian Church of the U. S. A. and, without committing itself to any particular project, urged upon our Commission the further study of proposals already before the Churches and the exploration of other approaches to the problem.

The General Convention authorized the Commission on Faith and Order to make clear the question of Holy Order in the Reformed Episcopal Church in order that negotiation for unity might come in the future.

The General Convention continued the Commission on Faith and Order and also the joint Commission on Approaches to Unity.

II.

The report of the North Carolina Council of Churches will be submitted under title, and a copy of this report is attached.

III.

The Commission on Faith and Order has been active during the past year. Members of the Commission attended all meetings of The North Carolina Council of Churches, one member served on an important committee of the North Carolina Council of Churches. Members of the Commission attended meetings of the Department of Christian Education of the Diocese, and outlined a program of study courses on Church Unity.

Journal of Proceedings

FIRST DAY

Raleigh, N. C., May 21, 1942

The one hundred and twenty-sixth annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina was held in St. Mary's Chapel, Raleigh, beginning May 21, 1942.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 a. m. with the Bishop as Celebrant, assisted by the Rev. H. F. Korman.

Morning Prayer was said at 9:30.

At 10:00 a. m. the Bishop called the Convention to order. On motion of Mr. A. B. Andrews, the roll call was omitted, and the Secretary certified that a quorum was present in both orders. The Bishop declared the Convention duly organized. On nomination the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence was elected Secretary. He appointed the Rev. R. Emmet Gribbin, Jr., as his assistant.

Mrs. Ernest Cruikshank, the President of St. Mary's School and Junior College welcomed the Convention. The printed program was adopted as the schedule of the convention.

The Rev. I. W. Hughes then took the chair and the Bishop read his annual address. (See Appendix A.)

The Bishop resumed the chair and Mr. Joseph B. Cheshire read the report of the Standing Committee. (Page 102.)

The Bishop appointed a Committee on Credentials.

Mr. A. B. Andrews made his report as Chancellor. (Page 104.)

Mr. L. F. London made his report as Historiographer. (Page 104.)

The Rev. I. H. Hughes then presented the following resolution:

Since the present world situation demands every economy in keeping with wisdom and the right sense of value, Be it resolved that this convention goes on record declaring that the Provincial Synod due to convene next fall should be dispensed with as an evidence

of our desire to comply with every effort of national defense as well as Diocesan and personal expense; That this Diocese shall notify the president of the Province, hoping that the other dioceses will fall in line with this decision of ours.

After some discussion the consideration of the resolution was postponed until the afternoon session.

As a committee on the Bishop's address, the chair appointed the Rev. William S. Turner, The Rev. Robert M. Man, Mr. E. G. Peoples, Mr. Shields Alexander, Mr. Harold C. Bird.

Mr. Paul F. Smith made the report of the Trustees of the Diocese. (Page 105.) This report was referred to a committee consisting of Mr. Kemp D. Battle, Mr. Frank Winslow, Mr. Fred Thomas.

The Rev. James S. Cox presented the report of the Executive Council. (Page 109.)

The report of the treasurer was presented by Mr. George D. Thompson and Mr. D. L. Gallagher, representing the Security National Bank.

Mr. F. M. Murdoch then invited the convention of 1943 to meet at St. Luke's Church, Salisbury. The invitation was accepted with thanks.

Mr. R. H. Lewis then presented the budget for Episcopal Maintenance. (Page 111.) After discussion the budget was adopted with no change. A motion in regard to Fire Insurance was carried over for later consideration.

A motion to change the title "Episcopal Maintenance" was referred to the committee on Canons.

On motion of Mr. R. H. Lewis the assessment against St. Mary's, High Point, for 1941 was remitted and for 1942 the assessment was fixed for \$50.

The budget for the Church's program was then presented and discussed. The Reverend Robert M. Man moved that the appropriations for the Social Service worker be increased to \$300. Carried, but the Executive Council was instructed to adjust its items so that there would be no increase in the total. The budget for the Church's Program was then adopted. (Page 112.)

A recess for lunch was then taken. The Convention re-assembled at 2:00 p. m.

The Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., offered the following resolution:

Resolved: that it is the sense of this Convention that the office of a Diocesan Director of Religious Education is important and should be retained provided funds for its maintenance become available.

Motion carried.

The Rev. E. B. Guerry presented the report of the Committee on the State of the Church. (Page 114.)

The Rev. J. M. Dick made the report for the Committee on Credentials. All delegates were seated.

Mr. M. D. Whisnant made the report for the Thompson Orphanage. (Page 116.)

The report of the President of the Woman's Auxiliary was submitted by title and ordered printed in the Journal. (Page 117.)

The Rev. D. W. Yates made an oral report as Trustee of the University of the South.

As a special committee to consider the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, the Bishop appointed the Rev. James S. Cox, Mr. William H. Ruffin, and Mr. Channing B. Brown.

The Rev. E. H. Goold made his report on St. Augustine's College and St. Agnes' Hospital. (Page 118.)

The Bishop then appointed the Canonical and Special Committees. (Page 7.)

The report of the Trustees under the will of General Smith, the report of the Examining Chaplains and the report of the Good Samaritan Hospital were submitted by title, and the last two were ordered printed in the Journal. (Page 121.)

Mr. J. S. Holmes presented his report as Trustee of Kanuga. (Page 122.)

The report of St. Mary's School and Junior College was submitted by title, (Page 123) and the Rev. H. F. Kloman spoke on the School.

The Rev. A. S. Lawrence presented the report on College work. The report was supplemented by the Rev. R. E. Gribbin, Jr.

The Rev. I. H. Hughes submitted by title the report of the North Carolina Churchman. (Page 126.)

On motion of the Rev. W. G. Clark the secretary was instructed to send a telegram of greeting and sympathy to the Rev. R. B. Owens.

The report of Vade Mecum was presented by the Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr. (Page 127.)

For the Committee on Pension Arrearages Mr. A. B. Andrews reported orally.

Mr. Andrews then presented the following resolution:

Resolved: that, in view of the National emergency, the Diocese of North Carolina go on record that all church work be carried on as usual; however, that expenditures by missions, parishes, diocese, synods and general convention be held to necessary items; and where not necessary that conferences, or scheduled meetings of church bodies, may be omitted or curtailed as to time or attendance when so decided by the governing board of such body.

The committee to whom the Bishop's address was referred reported as follows: All the resolutions were adopted.

1. BE IT RESOLVED that the Bishop be requested to incorporate the substance of his address to the Convention in a pastoral letter to the congregations of the diocese.
2. BE IT RESOLVED that a copy of the Bishop's Necrology be sent to the families of the deceased clergymen by the Secretary of the Convention.
3. a. BE IT RESOLVED that the Bishop be authorized to increase the Diocesan Army and Navy Commission to such number as he deems advisable.
b. BE IT RESOLVED that the Commission be instructed to study the Military Camp situation and determine the best method the Church can use in meeting the needs of the men in the armed forces.
c. If deemed advisable, BE IT RESOLVED that the Bishop, with the Department of Missions, authorize the Army and Navy Commissions to use the \$1,975 toward the expense of a Diocesan Civilian Chaplain; and be further authorized to

determine and follow out plans for the raising of any amounts needed in excess of the \$1,975.

4. BE IT RESOLVED that until the next Convention the Bishop and Executive Council be authorized to use such discretionary power as will enable them to act with promptness and decision in meeting the opportunities or critical emergencies which may arise in the diocese.

The Rev. R. E. Roe asked that the Committee on Diocesan and Parochial Missions be continued. The request was granted.

After considerable discussion of the Fire Insurance Policy, carried by the Trustees for Mission property, the whole matter of this Insurance was postponed until the next Convention.

The Convention then took a recess.

At 8:30 p. m. in the school auditorium The Chapel of the Cross of Chapel Hill presented its Centennial pageant "At the Crossroads on the Hill."

FRIDAY

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 a. m. with the Bishop as Celebrant assisted by the Rev. H. F. Kloman. The offering was received for the New York Bible and Common Prayer Book Society.

Morning Prayer was said at 9:30 a. m. At 10:00 a. m. the Bishop called the Convention to order.

The Rev. F. B. Drane reported for the Military Training Camp Commission. (Page 131.)

The report of the Laymen's League was presented by Mr. C. A. Tucker. (Page 133.)

Mr. J. B. Cheshire asked the approval of the Convention of a plan to separate St. Agnes Hospital from St. Augustine's College, and to organize a separate non-stock corporation for the purpose of running the Hospital. The National Council and the Church Institute for Negroes have already approved. The Convention approved the plan.

The Convention then proceeded to elections. On motion

of Mr. Hal A. London it was agreed that a plurality should be sufficient to elect. Where there was no contest the secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for such candidates. As Tellers the Bishop appointed Rev. F. H. Board, Rev. R. J. Womble, Mr. N. M. Redfern, and Mr. Robert Watt.

The Rev. C. A. Cole presented a resolution dealing with the Youth Commission. It was referred to the Committee on Canons.

A resolution was introduced by the Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, looking towards the annual meeting of the Convention at St. Mary's School. Consideration of this resolution was postponed until next year.

The secretary presented to the Convention an Annotated Edition of the Canons prepared by the Rev. R. B. Owens. It was received with thanks.

Mr. K. D. Battle presented the report of the Special Committee on the report of the Trustees.

The Committee to which was referred the report of the Trustees of the Diocese and the audit of its trust funds reports as follows:

We have read the report and the audit. There are some items not clear to the Committee which did not have an opportunity to confer with the Trust Officer of Security National Bank, the Custodian. So far as we can tell, however, the actions of the Trustees have been judicious, the accounts well kept, and the assets well managed.

One rather serious problem of policy presents itself. In the report of the Trustees and in the Audit, investments in stocks and bonds are carried at book value in the sum of \$35,736.61, approximately one half of the combined trust funds. The statement, "All stocks are paying dividends and all bonds are paying interest" might induce the belief that these are prime investments. As a matter of fact, some items are carried at prices wholly unrelated to present market values. Thus stock in R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company now selling at \$23 is carried at \$53. American Telephone Company now selling at \$115 is carried at \$162. These changes in value are of course due to forces entirely beyond the control of the Trustees or the Custodian. We, the Committee, do not know just what policy is pursued by fiduciaries under such circumstances, but it seems to us that periodical revaluations would furnish a more realistic picture of our actual financial situation and would enable us more intelligently to plan for the inevitable reduction in yield which such shrink-

age in capital values foreshadows. We might even consider deflecting a larger part of the income than the present 5% toward rebuilding the trust funds to their original value. Certainly the value of a participating unit in the consolidated Trust fund should be re-appraised when drawn out of the basket as seems to have been done in the case of the Mooresville Church lot. (Exhibit B of Audit). At any rate, the Problem is an important one and we commend it to the careful thought of the Convention.

On motion the Trustees were requested to report the cost in market value of Stocks and Bonds as of January 1 of each year.

The report of the Special Committee on the report of the State of the Church was made by the Rev. J. S. Cox.

Your committee, first of all, heartily approves the general sentiment of the Report of the Committee on the State of the Church that the need of the day is a "most carefully planned evangelistic offensive." It further approves the six specific recommendations.

Your committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That the clergy of the diocese read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church in their respective vestry meetings immediately on receiving their copies of the 1942 Journal.

2. That the Bishop consider recommendation No. 5 with reference to marriage instruction and include it as far as possible in his pastoral letter.

Your committee further moves:

1. That the Convention instruct the Executive Council to make a survey of the cities of the diocese as to their need for churches and apprise the Rectors and Vestries of their appraisal.

2. That the Convention instruct the Executive Council to consider recommendation No. 2 in the report, with reference to the organization of the Diocese into Convocations, and return definite proposals at the next Convention.

The report of the Work Among the Deaf was read by the Bishop and signed by the Rev. R. C. Fortune. (Page 132.)

After some discussion as to methods of apportionment it was moved and carried that a Special Committee headed by the Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., be asked to make a further study, and to report to the Department of Missions.

Mr. R. H. Lewis offered the following resolution, which was carried:

Resolved: that the Assessments of Missions for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund of 1943 be increased by an amount not exceeding the Premium on the Fire Insurance protecting the Mission property, at the discretion of the Executive Council.

The Rev. R. E. Roe reported for the Committee on Canons:

1. Resolved: that in Article IX Section 3 the word "males" be changed to the word "communicants."
2. Your committee disapproves of the proposal to change the term "Episcopal Maintenance" to "Diocesan Maintenance," and asks to be discharged from further consideration of the subject.

The resolution was adopted and the report of the committee accepted.

Mr. Channing B. Brown invited the Convention to the celebration of the twentieth anniversary of the Consecration of Bishop Penick. The time and place to be determined later.

The Rev. R. A. Bridges reported for the Lenten offering. (Page 133.)

The Bishop nominated as Examining Chaplains, Rev. R. B. Owens, Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Rev. E. H. Gould, Rev. F. C. Brown, Rev. J. A. Wright, and Rev. I. H. Hughes. The Convention ratified the nominations.

Miss Lillie H. Hill addressed the Convention on the Penn-Carolina Bible Conference.

In response to requests as to the relationship of the USO and the Church the Bishop read a letter of explanation from the Executive Secretary of the Federal Council of Churches.

The Rev. W. J. Gordon offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved: that this Convention endorse the work of the American Bible Society especially in the Emergency needs caused by the present world situation, and urge the receiving of an offering for this purpose on the second Sunday in Advent or such other time as best suits the individual choice.

The Bishop nominated to the Murdoch Society, to serve for two years, the Rev. A. S. Lawrence, the Rev. D. W. Yates, Mr. F. O. Clarkson. The Convention ratified the nomination.

The Rev. W. S. Turner offered the following three resolutions, which were adopted:

Whereas there has been a pressing need within the Diocese of an annotated Book of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of North Carolina, and

Whereas the Rev. Robert Bruce Owens, with the collaboration of others, has diligently labored since the last Convention in the preparation and completion of such a Book, and has now placed it in the hands of the Convention;

Be it resolved that the 126th Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina hereby express its appreciation of this splendid invaluable work of the Rev. Robert Bruce Owens and his collaborators.

Be it resolved that the 126th Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina extend our deep appreciation to Mrs. Ernest Cruikshank, the President of St. Mary's School and Junior College; to Bishop Penick, Chairman, the Board of Trustees; to Mrs. Nannie Marriot, the Dietitian and Superintendent of Buildings; Mrs. Wal-

ter Simpson, Assistant, and their staff; to the Rev. Henry F. Kroman, Chaplain; Mr. A. W. Tucker, Business Manager; and all associated with the School, for their prodigal provision for the comfort, health, well-being, physical and spiritual, of the delegates, and for the Convention meetings and services. This has so greatly contributed to the sense of congeniality, unity and success of the Convention, that we are eager to share more of their unexcelled hospitality.

Whereas the Parish of the Chapel of the Cross, undaunted, determined at some sacrifice, extra labor and expense, to present the Pageant at the Convention being held at St. Mary's School and Junior College, Raleigh, and

Whereas the Pageant, "At the Crossroads on the Hill" was presented on the night of Thursday, May 21, and proved to be of so interesting a nature, so splendidly and successfully presented, and so stimulating,

Be it resolved that the 126th Convention hereby express to the Author and Director, Dr. Urban T. Holmes, to the cast and staff of the Pageant, to the Rector, Assistant Rector, the Vestry and Parish of the Chapel of the Cross, our deep appreciation and gratitude;

APPENDIX A

ADDRESS AND JOURNAL OF THE BISHOP

Address of the Bishop

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

As we assemble for the 126th Annual Convention of this Diocese, I suspect that in some minds the question is being asked, "Are we sufficient for the duties and responsibilities of this epochal moment in the history of our Church and nation? Are we equal to the tasks and opportunities that have been thrust upon us by this unprecedented crisis?" A good answer to this fearsome question is suggested by an incident described in the book of Exodus. According to this old story, Moses had appealed to his people to help him build a tabernacle to the glory of God. It would require their generous gifts, their loyal services, their best labors and above all, a sacrifice. And no sooner had Moses spoken than the children of Israel responded with free-will offerings and with a heart and mind bent upon doing well all that pertained to God's sanctuary. Whereupon the unknown editor of this ancient book makes this significant comment: "For the stuff they had was sufficient for all the work."

Naturally we feel unequal to a situation that as individuals or citizens or church members we have never faced before. New conditions for which there are no helpful precedents; new problems which former experience has never solved, new economic strains, social tensions and a whole host of personal fears and domestic anxieties throng upon us and bewilder us and tempt us to question ourselves and suspect our neighbor and even doubt our God. This, I say, is natural. But for the Christian, this insufficiency is not all. There is another factor or increment in his make-up. He calls it supernatural. And that is the very element, a mysterious, intangible element, and yet indubitably real, that changes his whole complexion of life, that lifts his head, that steadies his hand, that clears his thinking and keeps his perspective right. This is life's indispensable extra, the spiritual plus, the faith that enlists and engages nothing less than the wisdom and power of God. My confidence that the clergy and laity of this diocese have put on this panoply of God enables me to say,

as I consider the welfare of His sanctuary, "The stuff they have is sufficient for all the work."

* * * * *

We all regret the circumstances, unpredictable a year ago, which have rendered it impossible for this Convention to meet, as we had expected, at the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, earlier in this month. We had anticipated this Convention with special pleasure as it was planned to coincide with the Centennial observance of this parish. However, an unforeseen condition occasioned by a war necessity intercepted these well-laid plans and forced the Convention to seek another meeting place. Fortunately, St. Mary's School with complete facilities was available, owing to the Centennial commemoration here, and the advanced Commencement exercises. Thanks to the hospitality of St. Mary's officers and trustees, our inability to meet at Chapel Hill has been happily offset by the unique privilege of assembling here.

The history of this Institution has been ably and adequately reviewed during the Centennial program of the past few days. It is too familiar to most of you to call even for a sketchy repetition here. Suffice it to say that the Diocese is grateful for the founding of this school by the Rev. Dr. Aldert Smedes in 1842, for the wholesome Christian influence it has extended into the homes of many states, particularly the Southern states, over a period of one hundred eventful years. To no small degree we attribute the stability of the homes that are represented by the patrons of St. Mary's to the enlightened and consecrated womanhood that has been trained in this place. And to our thanks for the honorable record of this beloved school we add our gratification that the superior standards of education and culture and Christian idealism have never been more successfully maintained than they are today. We give our felicitations to Mrs. Cruikshank, the President, the faculty and all those who are or have been through the years responsible for this conspicuous achievement in the educational field. And we pray that the suffi-

cient light of God's truth will continue to glow in this place for many generations yet to come.

* * * * *

Twice in 1941 the diocese was saddened by the death of prominent clergymen. On October 14th, the Rev. Francis Hopkinson Craighill, Rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount, and of St. John's, Battleboro, ended a ministry of rich influence. Mr. Craighill, a native of Virginia, came to North Carolina on June 30, 1921, from the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia. He was a man of extraordinary versatility. His interests embraced a surprising variety of subjects in which his knowledge was expert and profound. By disposition he had a singular simplicity that made him at ease with nature. Flowers bloomed at his touch and the birds of the air were his friends. But these congenial pursuits were side interests, the response of a gentle spirit to the loveliness that welcomed him because he greeted it. His one all-absorbing devotion was his ministry to "all sorts and conditions of men." He held the key to youthful hearts. He knew how to quicken loyalties in young and old alike. Chiefly he ministered in secret to poor and obscure and humble folk. He was the pastor to the "forgotten man." While he spoke with conviction and courage and with the thoroughness of real scholarship, I suspect that memory will enshrine his name in gratitude chiefly because he brought to men in a way they understood and loved, the healing gentleness of God's strength.

Hardly had the diocese recovered from the shock of Mr. Craighill's death, when we were suddenly called to mourn again. On November 13th, while he was in the midst of a preaching mission, at which he excelled, the Rev. Belford Northrop deFoe Wagner was summoned to a higher ministry. Since December 18, 1923, when he moved to North Carolina from the Diocese of Virginia, Mr. Wagner had been Rector of Emmanuel Church, Warrenton, and Priest in Charge of Good Shepherd Church, Ridgeway, and St. Alban's, Littleton. It is impossible to characterize in a few words a man of many talents who did all things well. As preacher, he spoke with the au-

thority of one who knew from experience the truth he proclaimed with eloquence and grace. As a pastor, he was quick of sympathy and tender-hearted. Few clergymen whom I have known were more faithful or comforting in their ministrations to the sick. He loved the Church and her ways and was an authority in liturgical usages. Essentially of an artistic nature, he consecrated his talent for music, painting and wood-carving to the beautification of worship or the adornment of chancel and sanctuary. For the past few years of his life, he found a new outlet for his craftsmanship in courses for boys at Vade Mecum Camps. His warm nature quickly won the confidence and affection of youth. Like the rest of the diocese, our boys will miss "Uncle Ben."

I do not feel as if I should permit a year to go by without paying respectful tribute to the Rev. Francis Joyner who died at the home of one of his daughters in Littleton on February 28th last, at the age of eighty-nine. Ordained by Bishop Watson in 1890, Mr. Joyner served in East Carolina until 1901 when he became Archdeacon of the Raleigh Convocation. For the next eighteen years he served the Churches in Littleton, Ridgeway, Middleburg, Jackson, Northampton County and Pittsboro. He retired in 1919. Mr. Joyner was a gentleman of the Old South and a clergyman of the Old School. His character was the fruit of severe self-discipline. Beginning at the age of fourteen, during the War between the States, he became the manager of a large plantation, and thereby learned at an early age how to accept responsibility. He knew how to minister to people with simplicity in the essential things of the spirit. He had the wisdom of one who had lived long and suffered much. His convictions were the kind that had been purified by fire. The Christian life to him was composed of elemental things: faith like the unquestioning trust of a child; a loyalty to duty that asked no favors and offered no complaints; a good neighbor's love of people for their own sakes, regardless of age or race or station in life. It does us good to have known such a kindly man, a true representative of a gracious age that has nearly passed,

who filled a long ministry with honor and then answered the summons to "come up higher."

For these faithful stewards of the manifold grace of God, we give Him thanks.

The following clergymen were added during the year 1941.

February 16, the Rev. Joelzie Howard Thompson, Presbyter, was received from the Diocese of Arkansas.

March 1, the Rev. Charles Frederick Wulf, Presbyter, was received from the Diocese of Kentucky.

June 15, Franklyn Heemann Board, Candidate for Holy Orders, was ordained Deacon.

June 22, Edwin Bedford Jeffress, Jr., was ordained to Deacon's orders.

July 1, the Rev. Jadi Levi Martin, Presbyter, was received by transfer from the Missionary District of Honolulu.

July 2, The Rev. Charles Kane Cobb Lawrence, Deacon, was admitted by Letter Dimissory from the Diocese of Western Massachusetts.

To bring this record up to date we should add the names of those who have moved in to the Diocese since January 1st. They are the Rev. Gray Temple, Presbyter, from the Diocese of Virginia; the Rev. Henry Johnston, Jr., Presbyter, from Southwestern Virginia; The Rev. Josiah Tidball Carter, from West Virginia; The Rev. Gerhard Charles Stutzer, Deacon, from Pennsylvania.

Within the last few days, the Rev. Homer P. Starr has removed to this Diocese from Tennessee.

Although he has not been transferred to this Diocese, the Rev. Robert Emmet Gribbin, Jr., has been engaged in work among students at Chapel Hill since July 1, 1941.

We welcome these twelve additions to our circle of devoted clergymen. Already, even where their ministries have been brief, they have commended themselves to their respective congregations by the superior quality of their services.

During 1941, we lost the following clergymen:

September 22, the Rev. Joseph Nicholas Bynum by transfer to Tennessee.

October 14, the Rev. Francis Hopkinson Craighill by death.

October 24, the Rev. James Dunbar Beckwith to the Diocese of Virginia.

November 13, the Rev. Belford Northrup deFoe Wagner by death.

And on February 28, 1942, the Rev. Francis Joyner by death.

FIELDS OF LABOR

The fields in which our clergy have been at work remain the same as last reported with the following exceptions:

February 16, the Rev. Joelzie Howard Thompson became Rector of St. Ambrose' Parish, Raleigh.

March 1, the Rev. Charles Frederick Wulf became Priest in Charge of St. Saviour's Mission, and assistant rector of Christ Church, Raleigh.

March 1, the Rev. Wm. H. Wheeler became Priest in Charge of St. Andrew's Church, Charlotte, in addition to his other duties at the Thompson Orphanage and the Chapel of Hope in that city.

May 1, the Rev. C. Alfred Cole, formerly Rector of St. Stephen's Parish, Oxford, and associated Missions, became Rector of St. Martin's, Charlotte. He was succeeded on January 1, 1942, by the Rev. Henry Johnston, Jr.

June 11, the Rev. Rufus J. Womble was ordained to the Priesthood and continued in charge of St. Mark's, Roxboro, and Christ Church, Milton.

June 15, the Rev. Franklyn H. Board became Deacon in Charge of Christ Church, Albemarle, and St. James' Mission, Kannapolis.

June 22, the Rev. Edwin B. Jeffress, Jr., became Deacon in Charge of Trinity Church, Mt. Airy, and of Galloway Memorial Mission, Elkin.

July 2, the Rev. Charles C. K. Lawrence became Deacon in Charge of Certain Edgecombe County missions.

July 6, the Rev. Jadi L. Martin moved from Calvary Parish, Wadesboro, where he had been temporarily in charge, to the rectorship of Christ Church, Cleveland, and its associated mission, St. Matthew's, Rowan County.

July 6, the Rev. G. Charles Stutzer became Deacon in Charge of St. Paul's and St. Peter's Missions in Salisbury.

October 14, the rectorship of the Good Shepherd Parish, Rocky Mount, became vacant upon the death of the Rector, Mr. Craighill. This position was filled on February 1st of this year by the Rev. Gray Temple.

October 24, the Rev. James D. Beckwith resigned as Rector of St. Matthew's, Hillsboro. That parish is now vacant.

November 1, the Rev. Morrison Bethea resigned the charge of St. Thomas', Reidsville, and Epiphany, Leaksville, and retired from the active ministry under the Church Pension Fund. This field is still vacant.

November 13, Emmanuel Parish, Warrenton, and associated missions at Littleton and Ridgeway became vacant upon the death of the Rector, Mr. Wagner. No clergyman has yet been secured for this field.

Since the first of this year, 1942, in addition to the changes already alluded to, we have been pleased to have the vacancy at St. Joseph's and St. Andrew's, Durham, filled by the Rev. Josiah T. Carter. On March 1, the Rev. Jacob Richard Jones, non-parochial Priest of the diocese, retired under the Church Pension Fund.

Special recognition should be made of the formation of St. James' Mission at Kannapolis, under the Rev. Franklyn H. Board and of St. Paul's Mission at Thomasville, under the Rev. Wm. P. Price. Both of these new congregations hope to erect suitable Church buildings as soon as conditions are favorable. St. Philip's Mission, Salisbury, was reopened in midsummer of 1941. Regular services have been maintained since by the Rev. Edward B. Guerry.

There are today affiliated with this diocese sixty-nine

clergymen, of whom fifty-three are active parochial priests, nine non-parochial, three in the process of being transferred, and four deacons. The latter will be ordained within the next month. The Candidates for Holy Orders are:

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I submit by title my Journal of Official Acts for the year 1941. Summarized briefly, they were as follows:

Visitations, 120; Celebrations of the Holy Communion, 44; Baptisms, 1 adult and 2 infants; Weddings, 6; on one occasion pronounced the Benediction of the Church upon a couple already married; officiated at 9 Funerals and 24 other services. I advanced one Deacon to the Priesthood, and ordained two Candidates for Holy Orders to the Diaconate. I opened one Church building for worship, confirmed 732 persons, licensed 44 Lay Readers, attended 62 committee or trustee meetings, held 121 conferences with groups or individuals, preached 97 times and delivered 61 addresses and lectures.

Outside the Diocese I preached 11 times, made 2 addresses, confirmed 21 persons, officiated at one wedding, attended 2 conferences, one of them of 3 days' duration, attended 2 committee meetings and the sessions of the Synod of the Fourth Province.

Worthy of special notice is the number of confirma-

tions, 732, of which 123 were Negro candidates. This, I believe, is the largest number of people ever confirmed in this diocese in one year. I am sure it is the record for the past twenty years. It is evidence of the effectiveness of the clergy, the seriousness of their congregations and also the emphasis upon the importance of Confirmation in the curriculum of the Church Schools.

* * * * *

On July 10, 1861, at Grace Church, Morganton, Bishop Atkinson opened his address to the Diocesan Convention with the following words: "The time and place at which we are assembled admonish us that strange and unexpected events have occurred since we separated last year."

This Convention, like that of '61, is our first following the declaration of war. This occasion admonishes us that we are confronted with opportunities, maybe with perils, such as the Church has not known in this generation. Under such extraordinary circumstances, you might expect from me today proposals for a new and extended program of Church activities commensurate with our new duties as Christian people. But such is not the case. This may be due to lack of vision or leadership or insight on my part. However, I sincerely believe that the Diocese is even now potentially strong enough to meet the challenge of this emergency. We have the trained man-power in the personnel of our clergy and laity. We have adequate equipment in most places. We have experienced organizations for men, women and youth. Our supreme need is not some novel type of war machinery that can be created by Convention action. It is rather a new commitment to the old gospel, a re-armament with the invisible panoply of God.

Of course, there are specific tasks that we know must be done this year.

We must maintain our missionary program intact and, if possible, expand it.

We must give aid again to British Missions. Our proportionate share this time is \$3200.

We must enlarge our present Army and Navy Commis-

sion in order to keep pace with the construction of more military training centers within the diocese. In this connection, may I record my judgment as favoring the appointment of a Diocesan Army and Navy Chaplain, without parochial responsibilities, whose sole duty it will be to coordinate the work of our Church in behalf of the soldiers, particularly within the camp area, and to relate the men in training to the neighboring parish or mission.

Since the draft upon the ranks of the clergy for Chaplains in the Army and Navy should become more serious, as we may well expect, and make it increasingly difficult to secure enough ministers to keep our Churches open, we must utilize the talents of more godly laymen as Lay Readers or missionaries in vacant Churches.

We should, in my opinion, take such action as this Convention may consider wise, to convey to the Bishop and Executive Council such a measure of discretionary power, as will leave them free, especially in matters of finance, to act with promptness and decision in case of emergency. If anyone should fear that such a proposal would possibly lead to an undesirable concentration of ecclesiastical authority, let me say that this suggestion is offered solely as a practical expedient for enabling the Church to function worthily. Opportunities for service might come and go while the processes whereby authority is ordinarily conveyed are tardily observed. In a day when no one can foresee what might happen, authority should correspond to responsibility.

All of these things, however, are of secondary importance. Any group of intelligent Church people with some experience could perform them well. But we must not allow ourselves to imagine that when we are busy here and there with sundry types of war work, we are doing all that might be expected of Christian people. Human resources are equal to these minor tasks. What is needed most, what is hardest to acquire, what few are willing to pay the price to discover, is that hidden reinforcement that no human resource can supply. We are beginning to catch glimpses of the inexhaustibleness of God's vast

spiritual resources that wait for their application to human problems for men of faith to appropriate and use them. By prayer, by communion, by worship, by trust in our invincible God "who keepeth watch above His own," we must come boldly unto the throne of grace where alone we may find grace to help us in this time of need. **This**, my brethren, is the inescapable spiritual imperative of this hour.

Pursuant to our engagement, we have made an audit of the books of account and records of

THE EPISCOPAL MAINTENANCE FUND

and

THE CHURCH'S PROGRAM FUND

of

THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

SECURITY NATIONAL BANK, *Treasurer*

For the Year Ended January 31, 1942

and submit herewith our report consisting of seven Exhibits, six Schedules, and the following

COMMENTS:

All recorded receipts were traced into the bank accounts of the respective funds as carried in the Trust Fund Ledger of the Security National Bank, Raleigh, North Carolina. Receipts from Trustee Banks of Endowment and Trust Funds, and payments made by Missions and Parishes on assessments and pledges as well as other items of income were not verified beyond the records of the Diocesan Treasurer. Disbursements were made on properly signed and endorsed checks.

In view of the fact that no separate bank account is carried by the Treasurer for monies on deposit to the credit of the Diocese of North Carolina, (all monies being deposited in the "Uninvested Trusts" bank account of the Trust Department of the Security National Bank), it was impossible to verify the cash on deposit to the credit of the Treasurer of the Diocese of North Carolina at January 31, 1942 beyond the records of the Trust Department as kept for each fund.

EPISCOPAL MAINTENANCE FUND

Exhibit "A" has been prepared to show the financial condition of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund at January 31, 1942 according to the records of the Treasurer.

Assessments due from the various Missions and Parishes are shown in detail on Schedule 1. These uncollected assessments are excluded from the Surplus account by setting up a 100% reserve

account. As and when these assessments are collected they are then taken up as income.

The amount due Mr. Henry M. London (deceased) represents a returned check charged against the personal bank account of Mr. London in 1939 and redeposited in error to the credit of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund.

1942 assessments prepaid at January 31, 1942 are shown in detail in Schedule 1.

Exhibit "B" has been prepared to show the recorded income by sources and expenses by objects as compared with the 1941 budget estimates of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund for the year ended January 31, 1942.

Exhibit "C" has been prepared to show, in summary form, the recorded cash receipts and disbursements of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund for the year ended January 31, 1942.

In connection with payments on assessments as shown on Schedule 1, your attention is called to the fact that on October 24, 1941 a collection in the amount of \$25.00 was made and entered on the records as "Holy Trinity—Vade Mecum." This item was not credited to any of the Mission accounts, and we were unable to ascertain which "Holy Trinity" Mission should receive credit. We have, therefore, shown this amount separately at the end of the White Missions on Schedule 1. If and when it is determined which Mission should receive credit for this amount, the records of the Treasurer can be corrected accordingly.

CHURCH'S PROGRAM FUND

Exhibit "D" has been prepared to show the financial condition of the Church's Program Fund at January 31, 1942 according to the records of the Treasurer.

The \$300.00 advance to Bishop E. A. Penick represents a check written to Bishop Penick as an "advance of unallocated funds from Holt Trust Funds." We were unable to determine whether this advance is to be repaid or not.

1942 pledges prepaid and special offering receipts not disbursed are shown in detail on Schedule 2.

Exhibit "E" has been prepared to show the recorded income by sources and expenses by objects as compared with 1941 budget estimates of the Church's Program Fund for the year ended January 31, 1942. Certain expense classifications of items shown on Exhibit "E" are shown in more detail on Schedule 3 to 6.

The \$300.00 street assessment paid to the town of Oxford rep-

resents an assessment due by St. Cyprian's Church and was marked as being paid from the Holt Trust Fund. The \$227.22 assessment for convocation of colored people represents a payment to the Church's Pension Fund for delinquent assessment of 1919-21 for principal of \$99.38 and interest of \$127.84.

Exhibit "F" has been prepared to show, in summary form, the recorded cash receipts and disbursements of the Church's Program Fund for the year ended January 31, 1942.

TRUST FUNDS

Exhibit "G" has been prepared to show the recorded cash receipts and disbursements for the year ended January 31, 1942 of those Endowments and Trusts not administered by the Security National Bank, Custodian. No verification of these transactions was made beyond the records of the Trust Department of the Security National Bank.

IN GENERAL

On Exhibit "D" we show as an asset, "Advance to Bishop E. A. Penick from Holt Trust Fund \$300.00." On December 17, 1940 the Standing Committee approved payment from the Holt Trust Fund to the Church's Program Fund of \$5,210.90 for rental, salary, and pension items, and for street assessments due by St. Cyprian's, Oxford. The Custodian actually transferred to the Church's Program Fund \$5,635.86, an excess of \$424.96. The so called advance was in reality a partial refund of this overpayment.

On Exhibit "E" under the expense item "Christian Education" we show an over expenditure of \$619.39. By reference to Schedule 4 it will be seen that the apparent over expenditure is caused by over payment of salary, travel, and office expense to the Diocesan Director of Christian Education in the amount of \$900.00. This was provided for by a contribution by the Women's Auxiliary which is shown on the income side of Exhibit "E."

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE

The Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina had five meetings during 1941 as follows:

On January 28, 1941, the Committee met in the office of the Secretary, Raleigh, N. C., and took the following action:

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Wallace Edmonds Conkling as Bishop of the Diocese of Chicago, and certificate to that effect was mailed to the Secretary of the Standing Committee of the said Diocese at Chicago.

The Bishop of the Diocese presented to the Committee a request from the Wardens and Vestry of Saint Andrew's Church, Greensboro, for the consent of the Bishop, with the approval of the Committee, for Saint Andrew's Parish to execute a note and mortgage for \$2500.00 upon the old Rectory of the Parish—for a loan by the Home Building and Loan Association of Greensboro, N. C., principal and interest being payable in installments, and same was approved and consent of the Committee was given accordingly, and certificate to that effect furnished the Bishop.

On May 6, 1941, the Committee met at the Parish House of the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, N. C., and took the following action:

The Committee recommended to the Bishop, for ordination to the Priesthood, the Reverend Rufus Josephus Womble, and certificate to that effect was mailed by the Secretary to the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Committee recommended to the Bishop, for ordination to the Diaconate, Mr. Franklyn Heeman Board, and certificate to that effect was mailed by the Secretary to the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Committee recommended to the Bishop, for ordination to the Diaconate, Mr. Edwin Bedford Jeffress, Jr., and certificate to that effect was mailed by the Secretary to the Bishop of the Diocese.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Oliver Leland Loring as Bishop of the Diocese of Maine, and certificate to that effect was mailed by the Secretary to the Secretary of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Maine.

On August 29, 1941, the Standing Committee met in the Library of Saint Mary's School, Raleigh, N. C., and took the following action:

The Bishop of the Diocese presented to the Committee a request from the Wardens and Vestry of Saint Peter's Church, Charlotte, N. C., for the consent of the Bishop, with the approval of the Committee, for Saint Peter's Church, Charlotte, to convey to the Pure Oil Company, an Ohio corporation, for a consideration of \$30,000.00, a certain lot and filling station in the City of Charlotte, Mecklenburg County, N. C., at the intersection of East Morehead Street and South McDowell Street, in said City, and being part of the property conveyed to the said Church by deed recorded in Book 674, Page 80,

Records of Mecklenburg County. The Committee approved said conveyance, and the Bishop was advised to consent thereto. Certificate to that effect was mailed to the Bishop with proposed deed.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Noble Cilley Powell, D.D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Maryland, and certificate to that effect was mailed by the Secretary to the President of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Maryland.

The Bishop of the Diocese presented to the Committee a request from the Wardens and Vestry of Christ Church, Raleigh, for the consent of the Bishop, with the approval of the Committee for the Wardens and Vestry of Christ Church to execute a mortgage or deed of trust, securing a loan on the Parish House and Rectory of said Christ Church. The consideration of this request was continued, pending a more definite description of the property.

On September 19, 1941, the Committee met in the office of the Secretary, Raleigh, N. C., and took the following action:

The following Postulants were recommended to the Bishop as Candidates for Holy Orders, and certificate to that effect in each case was signed and handed to the Bishop in person: Mr. Robert Williamson Turner, Jr., Mr. Robert Hampton Price, and Mr. William Jones Gordon, Jr.

The Bishop of the Diocese presented to the Committee a request of Saint Michael's and All Angels Church, Charlotte, for permission to mortgage its property. This request was continued with the suggestion that other information which the Bishop desires be furnished.

The Bishop of the Diocese presented to the Committee a request of the Wardens and Vestry of Christ Church, Raleigh, N. C., for the consent of the Bishop, with the approval of the Committee, for said Church to be allowed to execute and deliver a mortgage or deed of trust, securing a loan for \$15,000.00 on the Rectory of said Christ Church and on a strip of unoccupied land 55 feet wide running from the Rectory lot along the Northern side of New Bern Avenue. The Committee approved and advised the Bishop to consent to the said mortgage or deed of trust, and certificate to that effect was signed and mailed by the Secretary to the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Bishop of the Diocese presented to the Committee a request from the Wardens and Vestry of Saint Luke's Church, Salisbury, N. C., for the consent of the Bishop, with the approval of the Committee, for said Church to convey to Cartex Mills for a consideration of \$1,000.00 two certain small lots—one at the corner of Eleventh and Vance Mill Streets, and the second lot being a small tract of land lying between the Railroad siding of the Cartex Mills and the main line of the Southern Railroad, facing Eleventh Street. The Committee approved and advised the Bishop to consent to the sale and conveyance, and certificate to that effect was signed and mailed by the Secretary to the Bishop of the Diocese.

December 10, 1941, the Committee met at the Wilrick Hotel,

Sanford, N. C., and took the following action, the Bishop being present:

The Bishop presented to the Committee his proposed Schedule of Appropriations of Income from the Lawrence S. Holt Fund, and the same was approved by the Committee, and the Bishop was authorized to use in his discretion, within the terms of the said Trust, any undesignated balance from the 1942 income from said trust.

During the past year your Chancellor has had very few matters to come up for consideration.

In the case of one Parish whose vestry wished to convey a lot, they were advised that under the Canon of both the General Convention (Canon 59) and the Diocesan Canon (No. 24) that it was necessary for the written consent to be had of the Bishop and Standing Committee, in order to give title to the property.

One rector was advised that absence in the Armed forces of the United States of five of the members of the Vestry would not authorize the Parish adopting as a quorum less than a majority of 12.

This particular period has been chosen because it has been the most neglected, and therefore, the most necessary field of research in our church's history. The project is a large one and will, consequently, require some time for its completion.

I wish to report that up to April 1st of this year the University of North Carolina Press has sold 517 copies of my biography of Bishop Joseph Blount Cheshire.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

A detailed account of the activities of the Trustees is made in the attached EXHIBIT A, and of their receipts and disbursements in an audit report made by William M. Russ & Company, Certified Public Accountants, hereto attached and marked EXHIBIT B. Repetition of what appears in those reports, except in a general way, is not considered necessary in this report.

The total combined trust funds administered by the Trustees amount, at book value, to \$71,726.54. They consist of the following:

All of the stocks are paying dividends and all of the bonds are paying interest. None of the mortgage loans are in default. The advance of \$4,200.00 to the Bishop's Discretionary Fund was made for repairs to the property at 627 West Jones Street, Raleigh, N. C., and is in the nature of a first lien on the property. The advance of \$5,800.00 to the Emma Karrer Fund was made to clear the title to property at 117 South McDowell Street, Raleigh, N. C., which was received by gift, by Will, from Miss Emma Karrer.

The total Trust Funds of the Murdoch Memorial Trust amount, at book value to \$20,141.10. They consist of the following:

All stocks are paying dividends and all bonds are paying interest.

Notes receivable actually amount to \$6,368.86, but a reserve for losses in the amount of \$2,000.00 has been set up against these notes so that the net amount shown is only \$4,368.86. In addition, student loan of \$1,610.00, representing loans made to Divinity Students, are not carried as assets.

The gross income from the combined Trust Fund amounted for the year to \$3,168.28. The gross income from the Murdoch Memorial Fund amounted to \$925.05.

Although the income from investments is more than four per cent, the Trustees find it increasingly difficult to make investments in safe securities without a substantial reduction in income, because of general conditions in the investment field. State and Federal

Bonds, always considered the safest of investments, produce a very low yield. The Trustees also consider it in the interest of safety to diversify their investments and not confine themselves even to State and Government obligations. During the past year the Trustees invested \$5,200.00 in United States Government obligations. They made mortgage loans of \$4,684.62. These investments were made from combined trust funds. In the Murdoch Memorial Fund \$500.00 of United States obligations were purchased, and \$1,867.21 of first mortgage loans made.

The Trustees continue the policy of setting up a reserve of five per cent of income to take care of losses on investments.

At the last Convention the Trustees were directed to resign as Trustees under the Will of General William A. Smith, late of Anson County, at the expiration of the term of office of the administrative trustees, elected by the Convention. Those terms have now expired and the Trustees are tendering their resignation to the Court. They are informed that the court will accept their resignations and will appoint Trustees to carry on the work of the school in Anson County which was made possible by the generosity of General William A. Smith.

Attached to the Report of the Trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina to the Diocesan Convention at Saint Mary's School, Raleigh, N. C., on May 21, and 22, 1942, showing details of actions by the Trustees:

1941

February 3—Authorized the Christian Church of Macclesfield to use Saint John's Episcopal Church in Macclesfield on condition that the Church be kept in repair and insured at the expense of the Christian Church.

March 26—Declined to authorize the expenditure of \$600.00 by the Administrative Board under Items XXI and XXII of General William A. Smith's Will to meet certain bills for the purchase of equipment and other running expenses during the summer.

March 31—Authorized payment of \$250.00 to the Reverend Charles L. Pardee, D.D., 281 Fourth Avenue, New York City, Secretary of the American Church Building Fund Commission. This amount represents a refund of an advance to Saint Stephen's Church, Mooresville, N. C., on condition that it be repaid upon sale of the property. The property had been previously sold.

April 2—Authorized sale of lot in Town of Spring Hope to M. V. Parrish, at price of \$345.00.

April 17—Directed Durham Bank and Trust Company, Coolee-
mee, N. C., to transfer \$86.94, balance of H. L. Rice, as Administrator of Erwin Trust Fund to the account of C. E. Alexander, Treasurer of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Coolee-
mee, N. C.

May 1—Authorized the Security National Bank, Custodian, to pay from the proceeds of fire insurance on Saint Mary's House, Greensboro, N. C., the sum of \$451.85 to cover repairs, resulting from fire damage and to make check in favor of Jack Hunter Construction Company, Greensboro, N. C.

May 23—Authorized the payment of \$100.00 from the Alexander B. Andrews Trust Fund to Mr. Nat A. Gregory, Erwin Cotton Mills, Durham, N. C., to apply on the expenses of the Diocesan Forward in Service Committee.

July 12—Accepted on behalf of the Diocese deed from Anita W. Allen and G. G. Allen, conveying to the Diocese a lot in Kannapolis, N. C. The Deed is recorded in Book 160, Page 634 in the office of the Register of Deeds of Cabarrus County.

July 12—Approved sale of a lot in Pittsboro, N. C., known as Butler heirs lot at the price of \$600.00 on terms of \$75.00 cash and balance of \$525.00 in equal monthly installments for a period of three years, with interest at six per cent on deferred payments, the balance to be secured by purchase price deed of trust. Also authorized a commission of five per cent to Mr. R. G. Shannonhouse for making the sale.

July 12—Declined the request of the Virginia Electric and Power Company for an easement over the property of Grace Episcopal Church on the Tarboro-Scotland Neck Highway, Edgecombe County, N. C.

August 18—Instructed the Security National Bank, Custodian, as follows:

1. To pay the bill of W. M. Russ & Company in the amount of \$225.00 in accordance with recommendation of the Executive Council, except that \$100.00 of this bill be paid from the appropriation in the annual budget for the expenses of the Trustees.
2. To pay accumulated taxes on the properties located at 125 Halifax Street, 117 South McDowell Street, and 627 West Jones Street, all in the City of Raleigh, N. C., being rental real estate

owned by the Diocese, from such funds as may be available to the Trustees, provided that any advances made for the purpose of paying these taxes shall be repaid from the income received from the respective properties.

3. To reduce the interest on the advancement of \$5800.00 made by combined Trust Funds to the Emma Karrer Fund from 6% to 3½.

4. To compromise and settle the \$400.00 Bond held by the Receiver of the Mutual Building and Loan Association, secured by mortgage on 125 Halifax Street, for \$100.00.

5. To invest \$500.00 of uninvested funds in the Murdoch Fund in United States 2½% Defense Bonds, Series G.

6. To invest approximately \$3700.00 of uninvested funds in the Diocesan Control Account in United States 2½% Defense Bonds, Series G.

7. To sell ten rights of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company owned by the Diocesan Control Account, at the market of approximately 1 7/32, and to sell five of the same rights held by the Murdoch Fund.

October 2—Accepted on behalf of the Diocese a deed from Miss Bertha E. Richard, conveying two lots adjoining the Bishop Tuttle Community Center, to be held in trust for the use of the Community Center, but without restriction on the use of the lots or of Disposition if the Community Center were, in the future, discontinued. Deed is recorded in Book 668, Page 46 in the Wake County Registry.

October 2—Declined the request of Duke Power Company for an easement to install a pipe line over the property of Trinity Church, Mount Airy, N. C.

October 2—Authorized the Custodian to sell 25 shares of common stock of First National Stores held as an investment in the combined trust fund investment account at its market value of approximately \$38.00 per share. Also authorized the Custodian to purchase for investment \$1,000.00 United States Government Defense Bonds 2½%, Series G.

October 21—Approved loan of \$600.00 to Mr. Fred Reebals, secured by mortgage on realty in Wake County, North Carolina, payable \$300.00 annually.

November 4—Authorized the University of North Carolina Library to exchange duplicate items in the Lyman-Cheshire collection, which the Diocese of North Carolina lent to the University Library, for items not in the collection, on condition that the new items become a part of the Lyman-Cheshire collection.

November 21—Authorized loan of \$1500.00 to Howard P. Sompayrac, payable \$50.00 semi-annually, at six per cent interest, and

secured by first mortgage on real estate in Wake County, North Carolina, the balance to become due December 1, 1946.

The report of the Trusts owned by the Diocese is on file with the Trustees and also with the secretary.

The same is true of the report of the finances of the Francis J. Murdoch Memorial Society.

The same is also true of the report of the Trustees under the will of the late General W. A. Smith.

THE REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

Since the last meeting of the Convention four meetings of the Diocesan Executive Council have been held on the dates of June 20, 1941; September 17, 1941; January 7, 1942; April 21, 1942.

At the June meeting the Bishop appointed the following members to the following departments.

Finance: Messrs. R. H. Lewis, Chairman; Kemp P. Lewis, and Alexander B. Andrews.

Missions: Rev. David W. Yates, Chairman; Rev. C. E. B. Robinson, Mrs. Wilmot S. Holmes, Mr. John H. Clark.

Christian Education: Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, Jr., Chairman; Rev. John A. Wright, Mrs. Carl Herndon.

Christian Social Relations: Rev. Willis G. Clark, D.D., Chairman; Rev. C. E. B. Robinson, Mrs. Julius A. Mackie, Col. Joseph Hyde Pratt.

Promotion: Rev. James S. Cox, Chairman; Mesdames Wm. J. Gordon, Wilmot S. Holmes; Messrs. W. T. Anderson, and Hobart T. Steele.

The churches' quotas for the Church's Program Fund for 1942 were found by obtaining an average of the following factors: (1) \$5.50 per communicant for parishes, \$2.75 for organized missions, and \$1.25 for unorganized missions; (2) 50% of current operating expenses for the year 1940, taken from the 1941 Journal; (3) the average amount given annually over the last three years to the Church's Program Fund. Quotas for the three Institutions—St. Mary's School, St. Augustine's College, and St. Mary's Chapel of the Thompson Orphanage—were found by obtaining the average of factor 3.

The 1942 assessments of parishes and missions for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund were found by taking 9% of Current Operating Expenses for the year 1940, taken from the 1941 Journal. The assessments for the three Educational Institutions were fixed at the same as last year.

The churches in the Diocese pledged towards the 1942 Church's Program Fund \$53,089.97.

During the year the Department of Christian Education was able to secure the person of the Rev. Henry N. Parsley as full-time chaplain for the Episcopal students at Duke University.

The Department of Missions gave witness to the growth of the Diocese by calling attention to the establishment, within the year, of two new Church congregations at St. James', Kannapolis, and St. Paul's, Thomasville.

During the year the Department of Christian Social Relations undertook the promotion of a Thanksgiving Day offering for Negro orphans among the Negro churches of the Diocese.

The Department of Promotion carried out an extensive program in connection with the Every Member Canvass. It included (1) two conferences for the clergy held in Durham in October, (2) addresses made at the District Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary, (3) four Vestry-Supper meetings held at Charlotte, Raleigh, Wilson, and Winston-Salem.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

Your Committee recommends to this Convention for its consideration the following suggestions:

1. That the full co-operation of the clergy and laity be given to the Forward in Service Program of the National Church and the program of the Forward in Service Commission of this Diocese. We recommend for careful study the booklet, "Parish in Action," published by the National Council, with special reference to one of the first suggestions made therein, namely the setting up of a planning group in every parish and mission whose duty it will be to meet with the Rector to evaluate present programs and activities, to make surveys of the congregation and community and to plan new programs under his leadership. A dozen minds are always better than one.

2. That a study be given to the organization of the Diocese into convocations, not for the financial support of mission churches, but as a means of fellowship and inspiration among the clergy and laity of the various sections of the Diocese. In these convocations the needs and opportunities of the parishes and missions situated therein can be more closely studied. The negro churches could be formed into an additional convocation for the purpose of studying and furthering the work of our Church among the negro race.

3. That a strong and continual emphasis be placed upon the principle and joy of Christian Stewardship coupled with a policy of discouraging money-making schemes. Your committee realizes the need of occasional money-raising events, but believes that the stress should always be upon service and fellowship and that Church organizations should never allow themselves to go into business or become sales agencies for commercial interests. Your committee believes that the Gallup Poll's report on gambling in American Churches is in error concerning the Episcopal Church and that there is little or no gambling in the parish houses of this Diocese, e.g., by lotteries or raffles, etc.

4. That every Parish and Mission be missionary-minded to its own community and county as well as to the whole church. No parish or mission has the right to expect its clergymen to confine his evangelistic efforts to the congregation or congregations in his immediate charge. We wish to quote from a remarkable document, the Pastoral Letter of the House of Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Confederate States of America, issued in 1862 from St. Paul's Church, Augusta, Ga. "Every well established congregation should consider itself a center of missionary work and should encourage its pastor to extend his usefulness beyond its own limits, and, while he is priest to them, to be in some measure a missionary to all about him. As long as the selfish idea is indulged, that a minister is tied down to the local congregation and has no business to work around him, the church must languish or increase but slowly. Missionaries cannot be furnished for every village and neighborhood, and these must remain uncared for by the Church, unless the

settled clergy will make up their minds to extend the sphere of their operations beyond the narrow limits of their own immediate cures."

5. That the clergy stress in their instruction to couples to be married by them not only the sanctity of marriage but also the responsibility of having and rearing children in their Christian homes. We recommend more frequent use of the prayer in the marriage service: "Bestow upon these thy servants, if it be Thy will, the gift and heritage of children."

6. In regard to the work of the negro Churches of the Diocese your committee desires to call your attention to the fact that in 1930 the total number of negro communicants was 810 and that in 1940 the number increased to 1127. We believe the time is opportune to expand the work of our church among the negro race. We quote again from the above mentioned Pastoral Letter of the House of Bishops in the Confederate States; referring to this race they said, "The Church must offer more freely her ministrations for their benefit and improvement. Her laity must set the example of readiness to fulfill their duty towards these people and her clergy must strip themselves of pride and fastidiousness and indolence and rush, with the zeal of martyrs, to this labor of love. The teachings of the church are those which best suit a people passing from ignorance to civilization because while it represses all fanaticism it fastens upon the memory the great facts of our religion and through its objective worship attracts and enchains them."

Upon our request for information concerning the location of groups of Episcopal graduates of St. Augustine's college living in this Diocese, the president of that institution has furnished us a report, a part of which we pass on to you. "Where there is any considerable concentration of them in this diocese there is a Negro Church. The places which might have five or six Episcopal graduates and no Negro Church are High Point and Hamlet. Our recent as well as old graduates are widely scattered with two or three tending to be in most communities where there are any at all."

Your Committee believes that wherever two or three of these graduates can be gathered together by the various clergymen of the Diocese, there exists the distinct possibility for the creation of a new negro mission. In fact in the foreign field a missionary usually needs only one member to establish the beginnings of a new congregation.

REPORT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE

To you through whose efforts the work at the Thompson Orphanage is made possible, we wish to present a brief survey of the costs of our operations and of the sources from which the money is obtained.

Our budget of annual living costs is now \$33,065.10. This is somewhat higher than for the last few years, though not as large as the time before the depression. The greater part of the increase is found in the increase of prices brought about by the war.

The work of our case worker has resulted in an increased income from parents and counties and through these investigations the children whom we admit are in real need of our care and those whom we do not take can find that care with the family or some other kind of assistance.

By adding a general handy man, whose job it is to look after the property and the farm and with the help of our boys keep it in good repair. He is a painter and he and the boys have painted the inside of all of our cottages this year. The paint for this work was donated by the Woman's Auxiliaries and individual gifts. This year we hope to get the outside wood work of our cottages painted as this is much needed.

Our other item of heavy proportions is that of food for the children and this has been reduced with the products from our farm. We grow all of our vegetables and canned over four hundred gallons for winter use. This summer we have all of our land under cultivation and we hope to provide three times as much as last year. This farm is not only a financial saving but provides a splendid work program for the boys.

The Diocese of East Carolina has provided us with \$3,000.00 to re-place our barn. When this re-placement is made and we can produce our milk supply, this will be a saving.

The clothing of our children is generously carried by the Auxiliaries and by individuals, and their education is provided in the city schools.

Now, to meet expenses we have several sources of income. From the Duke Endowment, we receive about \$1,800.00 per year; from our own Endowment, about \$6,500.00. From County and from Parents, we receive \$1,500.00 (which we hope to increase and which has already shown some increase through the efforts of our case worker). But the greater part of our income, about \$20,000.00, or 2/3 of the whole, must come from the Churches, either from the Thanksgiving offering, from the Diocesan budget, or from individual or church contributions throughout the year.

During the year 1941 the Orphanage cared for 89 children. Of this number 19 were placed—1 in Nursing school, 1 in Business school, 5 self-supporting, and 12 with relatives. There are 73 children in the Orphanage at present. Three of these will graduate in

June. One is preparing to enter Nursing school, 1 is prepared to go to work as a secretary and 1 is going to join the marines.

During the year we lost our most gracious friend, Dr. W. Myers Hunter, who has so generously donated his services for the past 43 years. The health of our children is now cared for by the Nalle Clinic. The health of our children is remarkably good, and above the average.

The work and training program which has been put into effect has improved our children and has made them feel that they are doing something in return for what the institution is doing for them. This work is closely supervised and rewarded according to the job done. If a child does not do a good job, then some privilege is denied this child. Each child is required to do a certain amount of work for the institution each day. As a result of this program many improvements to the grounds and buildings have been made. At present we have all of our land under cultivation. We grow a big variety of vegetables in season. The boys have done all of this work except the plowing. The girls do the laundry work, mend, cook and sew.

We believe that the year 1941 has been a good one. Our income was sufficient to pay all of the bills and leave us a balance of \$213.59 to start the new year on.

Our job of selecting the most worthy children and finding places for those who have graduated has been done much better because of the help of our case worker. The children are responding well to our new work and training program. The Board of Managers and our various committees are capable and interested.

There are seventy-three fine children looking to us for support and encouragement. I pledge my best efforts to this task and know I can count on your support.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL

To attempt to make an appraisal of the endeavors and attainments of the past year is difficult. All work has been carried on under more or less apprehension due to world conditions; and yet, perhaps because of these, there has been a widened outlook and an intensified program. In all departments, adjustments to changed conditions have been given serious consideration.

Social Service has become Christian Social Relations in a real sense as we study Proposals for a Just and Durable Peace; The

Refugee situation, including our Migrant population as well as the uprooted peoples of Asia and Europe.

The Department of Christian Education has put an emphasis on deepened devotional living in individual, family and community life. Programs on The Christian Family and the Presiding Bishop's Book for Lent have intensified the conviction that only through repentance and better minds can the nations of the world become the kingdom of our Lord.

The variety of objects to which the Auxiliary has contributed attest awareness of all needs and inclination to contribute whenever we can.

The list of special gifts will be of interest to you. They are: The Bishop's Purse, Young People's Service League, St. Mary's House, Greensboro; British Missions, Chinese Relief, Negro Work in Monroe and Charlotte, Presiding Bishop's Emergency Fund, Medical Supplies for Alaska, Kanuga Chapel, Migrants, Vade Mecum Scholarships, Thompson Orphanage, Gifts to School, Hankow, China; To Diocese of Dornakal, India, and to eleven missionaries.

The amount sent to Thompson Orphanage for clothing for children was over \$1700.

Our Missionary Correspondent keeps up with all missionaries from our Diocese.

Members of the Auxiliary feel themselves under orders to Go Forward with you in this diocese. They have accepted their Keynote for this year, "Witnessing through Worship."

My term as president has been a privilege and it has made me realize the oneness of our aim, to make Christ known to all nations as their Saviour and their King.

REPORT OF ST. AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE

During the past year 229 students have been enrolled in the college department of the Institution. This number is six less than the enrollment in the department a year ago. Considering the war situation and the effect of the Selective Service Act this is a favorable showing in comparison with numerous other colleges. The students represent 21 states and the District of Columbia. It still remains true that about 50% of the students come from North Carolina, about 25% from other states in the South and about 25% from other parts of the United States. Such distant states as Texas and Wyoming are represented. About fifty are expected to receive degrees at Commencement time, the largest number to do so since the college was inaugurated. The termination of the small College Preparatory Department while it has somewhat reduced our enroll-

ment has resulted in our securing better opportunities for practice teaching in neighboring high schools and in our showing greater conformity to the standards of the Southern Association of Colleges.

The Bishop Tuttle Training School has been closed during the past year as the result of the action taken by the National Council and Woman's Auxiliary. A study is being made by them as to the possible reopening of the school and if so, on what basis.

As usual St. Augustine's is endeavoring to function as a definite Church-related College. Over one half of the student body and at least three fourths of the faculty are Communicants. This year the Bishop confirmed a class of twenty, five of whom had been recently baptized in the Chapel. The Lenten offering for Missions presented on Easter Day, totaled over \$300. Such organizations as the Woman's Auxiliary, both Junior and Senior branches, the Laymen's League, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew and the Altar Guild are actively functioning on the campus. A limited amount of religious work is done at St. Agnes Hospital and in the Community.

Conferences that have been held on the campus included the State Conference of Jeanes Fund teachers, the Annual Meeting of the Crown and Sceptre Honorary Scholarship Society, an organization of Negro High School students which was founded and is fostered by the college, a meeting of the regional planning committee of the Hazen Foundation and a meeting of the officials of the Negro Intercollegiate Athletic Association. The Annual St. Augustine's Conference for Church Workers, sponsored by the American Church Institute for Negroes, will be held June 1 to June 5. This year there is also to be held from June 7 to 17, in the Bishop Tuttle Building a conference of Field Workers in the province, sponsored by the Field Department of the Woman's Auxiliary.

St. Augustine's was one of the first colleges to form a committee for Civilian Morale and National Defense, including faculty and student members. Under the leadership of the committee there have been numerous meetings and discussion groups designed to give information as to war and post-war objectives. The college library has been selected by the United States Office of Education as one of the 140 libraries in the country asked to serve as being centers of information.

As a memorial to the late Mrs. A. B. Hunter a large room in the library has been equipped for special reading and research. This additional space has relieved the congestion in other parts of the building. The expense was met through the use of a bequest of Mrs. Hunter to the college.

An additional recreation room for young men has been secured by opening up a room in the basement of the Hunter Building. It has already proved to be very useful.

There will undoubtedly be a tendency toward a small enrollment in colleges of the type of St. Augustine's. We urge our graduates and friends especially among the Clergy to assist us in securing

suitable students. Only by their help can we hope to keep our normal enrollment.

St. Augustine's first opened its doors for instruction on January 13, 1868. We propose to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of its opening on about that date in January, 1943. In connection with this observance I hope that there will be an effort made by the Alumni and friends of the college to secure a generous contribution of Defense War Bonds which may later be used for other purposes. Someday St. Augustine's must have a suitable building for Physical Education. However at present there is a more pressing need for Physical Education Equipment which can be utilized now and later added to the equipment of our hoped-for building.

The Alumni Association is making progress under the leadership of its President, Dr. Edson E. Blackman of Charlotte. Special mention should be made of the large and enthusiastic meeting which was held in St. Philip's Church, New York City in January, and of the increased activity of the Raleigh Branch which among other activities has raised a scholarship fund to be awarded to a promising graduate of the local high school.

Early in March the college was saddened by the death of Dean Emeritus Charles H. Boyer who since his retirement in 1937 had continued to reside on the Campus. Dean Boyer had served the Institution faithfully and courageously for forty years and had helped greatly in establishing its high academic standards. He was buried from the College Chapel where he had been Warden and a faithful communicant from the date of its erection.

The campus sustained another loss in the death of Mrs. Eva B. Holmes, wife of our Superintendent, Mr. J. W. Holmes. A former teacher in the High School Department, she had in recent years filled important positions in other institutions and figured prominently in social and civic affairs. She also was buried from the College Chapel.

As a result of the recent action of the National Council St. Augustine's is to receive an increase in its appropriation from the American Church Institute for Negroes which will greatly aid the college in its objective of securing an improved rating from the Southern Association of Colleges.

ST. AGNES HOSPITAL

Acting on the authority granted them by the Trustees at its meeting last May the Executive Committee selected a Board of Managers for St. Agnes Hospital and Training School for Nurses. Mr. Alexander Webb of Raleigh is Chairman of this Board and Mr. Thomas Powell, Jr., of Raleigh, is Treasurer. Plans for the separate incorporation of the Hospital are now being made.

* * * * *

Early in January the Director of the American Church Institute

for Negroes, Rev. Cyril E. Bentley who was a reserve Chaplain in the U. S. Navy was called to active duty. Dr. Robert W. Patton, formerly Director of the Institute who retired full of honors a year ago, loyally responded to the call of duty and will act in Mr. Bentley's place during the latter's absence.

In conclusion I would urge the Diocese to continue and enlarge the aid that it is now giving the college. This would be a most fitting response to the generous support which the National Church is giving to an Institution which is so closely linked to the history and life of this Diocese.

REPORT OF GOOD SAMARITAN HOSPITAL FOR 1941

During the year 1941 the Good Samaritan Hospital endeavored to "Go Forward in Service" in its work of caring for the sick and suffering of the Negro race. Our total number of patients and patient days was the largest in the history of the institution.

Among the improvements made was the ambulance entrance and ramp built that patients might be more safely and comfortably brought into the hospital. A full-time Dietitian was added to our staff during the year.

A standard, Grade A training school with enrollment of thirty students was maintained and six nurses graduated in May.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation of the gifts and interest of the Duke Endowment, St. Peter's Church, St. Martin's

Church and our many friends who have enabled us to carry on during the year.

REPORT OF TRUSTEE OF KANUGA

I regret to report that I was unavoidably prevented from attending either the July 1941 meeting of the Board of Managers at Kanuga or the January 1942 meeting in Columbia. However, I have been in touch with the operation of the Kanuga Conference through the minutes of those two meetings, through personal conferences and correspondence and through visits to the property. The present report, therefore, will be based on these.

At a recent meeting of the Board your Trustee was called upon in his professional capacity to recommend whether it were advisable to cut timber on Kanuga property to furnish material for necessary improvement and repairs, or to purchase such lumber as was needed. After a rather careful study of this situation it was decided to postpone suggested construction and all repairs except those immediately pressing. It was found that there was little timber suitable for the purpose that did not seem to have a greater value where it stood in maintaining the monetary, recreational and spiritual values of the property as a whole.

As you no doubt are aware, the Kanuga property has never been fully paid for and notes are still held against it, amounting to around 10% of the listed assets. Since the indebtedness has not been decreasing, the Board at its meeting last January, requested the Trustees to meet and study the financial affairs of Kanuga and present a report with recommendations to the July meeting. Dr. Kirk of Hendersonville was asked to call the Trustees together, which he is planning to do shortly before the Board meets.

At last summer's meeting it was reported that the debt on the Chapel of the Transfiguration was reduced to \$362.00, with something more to be collected to complete the installation of screens. Some \$2600.00 had then been spent on memorials which included most of the pews. At the January meeting Bishop Jackson was able to announce that the Chapel had been fully paid for. As a result, the Board set July 19, 1942, as the date for the dedication of the Chapel. Our Presiding Bishop is being invited to be the preacher on that occasion.

Among other items of interest are the reduction of transportation rates from Hendersonville to Kanuga; a slight raise in rates of some features in order to more nearly meet the cost of operation; the election of Bishop Gravatt as Vice-President in place of Bishop Darst, resigned; the re-election of Bishop Gribbin as President and of Rev. A. Rufus Morgan as Superintendent and Treasurer; the change in name of the Y. P. S. L. Conference to the Young Peoples Conference; and renaming the Woodland Chapel as the Chapel of St. Francis of Assisi.

Plans are made for the opening of the Conferences about the usual time. No doubt the restrictions on gas will affect attendance on some of them, but it is hoped that the older groups and the guest period may be quite fully patronized. There is no need to emphasize the importance of this institution to this diocese as well as to the Church as a whole. North Carolina has learned and appreciates its value. I urge you to continue its patronage so that this diocese may continue to train its adults as well as its young people for leadership in a world which sadly needs them.

ANNUAL REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL, INCORPORATED OF RALEIGH, NORTH CAROLINA

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Incorporation, the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith the report for the academic year 1941-42.

Since the Diocesan Convention of 1941 there have been eight meetings of the Executive Committee and three meetings of the full Board of Trustees. At the called meeting of the Board on February 11, 1942, the Trustees adjourned after roll call, a quorum not being present.

Outstanding decisions reached at these meetings include:—

1. Acceptance and approval of Reports of Saint Mary's Officers and Auditor.
2. Continuous consideration of the advisability of a Centennial Celebration Drive and its administration, resulting in the decision that because of war conditions no intensive drive be held, but that voluntary donations be accepted through a Committee of Saint

Mary's Trustees, Faculty and Officers, Alumnae and Friends, the total amount received to be used for the purchase of United States Defense Bonds—Results most gratifying.

3. Support to the publication by the Alumnae of the book, "Life at Saint Mary's" as a Centennial Celebration feature—500 copies sold.

4. Approval of \$750.00 General Charge to New Students for the 1942-43 Session.

5. Approval of Improvement of College Avenue, the North Boundary of St. Mary's Campus, to include concrete side walk, curb and gutter and hard surface road. This work is well advanced but completion has been delayed on account of war conditions.

6. Approval of allowance to members attending Trustees and Executive Committee meetings for travel and subsistence expenses.

7. Acceptance of Memorial Window to Mr. Ernest Cruikshank placed in the west transept of Chapel.

8. Acceptance of Historical Marker placed on Hillsboro Street at end of walk to Smedes Hall.

9. Invitation to the Bishop to transfer the 1942 Diocesan Convention from the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, to St. Mary's School, because of the unexpected opening of a Naval Aviation School at Chapel Hill and consequent crowding of living conditions.

During the year the following new members have been welcomed to the Board of Trustees:

Rev. E. F. Moseley of Kinston, Diocese of East Carolina

Rev. W. T. Young of Fayetteville, Diocese of East Carolina

Rev. A. B. Clarkson of Edgefield, Diocese of Upper South Carolina

The 1941-42 session has been most satisfactory, with a capacity enrollment of resident students: 227 registrations accepted and in addition 62 Day and Special Students. Total 289.

The resident students come from 17 States and from China, one. From North Carolina 125; Virginia, 40; South Carolina, 13; Florida, 10; Georgia, 6; Tennessee, 5; Alabama, Maryland and New York, 4 each; Washington, D. C., 2; Kentucky, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, 3 each; and Delaware, Kansas, Massachusetts, New Jersey, 1 each.

The Religious affiliations given by 227 Resident Students are: Episcopalian 129; Presbyterian 50; Methodist 34; Baptist 10; and 5 from four other denominations. During the present session 4 Resident Students have been baptized and 10 confirmed.

The Religious affiliations given by 58 Day Students are: Episcopalian 23; Methodist 12; Presbyterian 9; Baptist 9 and 5 from three other denominations.

As this report is written the applications of 188 Resident students have been accepted for the 1942-43 session, of whom 86 are coming to Saint Mary's for the first time and 102 are returning stu-

dents. We expect a capacity registration for the 101st session which opens in mid-September 1942.

A condensed, financial statement of Assets and Liabilities of Trustees' Funds from the Auditor's report for the Fiscal year ending June 30, 1941, is attached.

The Trustees record once more their grateful appreciation to the officers and faculty of St. Mary's School for another year of successful management and efficient instruction.

REPORT OF COLLEGE WORK IN THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

We are happy to report that the College Work of the Diocese is progressing satisfactorily. As most of you know, the Rev. R. Emmet Gribbin, Jr., is assisting with the work at Chapel Hill. Since the first of the year the Rev. Henry Nutt Parsley has been giving his full time to the work among the Episcopal students at Duke. Miss Margaret Fletcher continues her excellent leadership of the girls at St. Mary's House in Greensboro. Sometime soon we want a special worker for State College, but in the meantime Miss Sara Cheshire's Bible Class and frequent gatherings at the Church

of the Good Shepherd and Christ Church keep the State students in touch with the Church.

The annual conference of Episcopal Students in the state was held at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, during the last week end of November. In February the Provincial Commission on College Work sponsored a Conference on the Ministry. This conference met in Florida and was attended by a small group of students from this diocese and by the Rev. David Yates of Durham and the Rev. Emmet Gribbin.

At the time of the meeting of the Synod in Charleston last fall, a provincial College Workers Conference was held. It was led by the Rev. Alden Drew Kelley of New York, and was attended by the Rev. Messrs. Parsley, Gribbin, Lawrence, and Miss Margaret Fletcher.

The number of our college students continues to increase. The war has not as yet seriously affected their numbers, but it has increased the significance and need for the Church's ministry to them. At Chapel Hill we now face the problems created by the pending influx of over 2,000 members of the new Naval Air Training School. From all our work come encouraging reports of good congregations and a deepening interest in the Church and in Christ.

We acknowledge with gratitude the grant from the Church Society for College Work which makes possible the full scope of the Church's mission at Duke University. ALFRED S. LAWRENCE

ANNUAL REPORT OF VADE MECUM CAMPS AND CONFERENCES
TO DIOCESAN CONVENTION—1941*The 1941 Schedule—*

Five Camps, five Conferences and the 10th Anniversary Reunion made up the program for 1941, lasting from June 6th through August 30th. The Camps and their directors were: Camp Cheshire Senior, Rev. David W. Yates; Camp Cheshire Junior, Rev. L. F. Kent; Camp Tise, Rev. C. A. Cole; Camp Penick Senior, Miss Mary Burgess; Camp Penick Junior, Miss Elsie Lawrence. The Conferences were: Y.P.S.L. Convention, Mr. Donald Clement, President; the Counselor-President Conference, Mr. Wm. J. Gordon, Jr., director; the Woman's Auxiliary Conference, Mrs. W. S. Holmes, director; the Laymen's League Conference, Mr. N. A. Gregory, director; the School of Teacher Training, Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, Jr., director. The 10th Anniversary Reunion was led by Rev. J. A. Vaché.

Attendance—

The total attendance last summer including all leaders and directors was 895 persons. Three camps were filled to capacity, namely Camp Cheshire Junior, Camp Penick Junior, and Camp Tise. All conferences were the largest ever held at Vade Mecum.

Personnel and Leadership—

To the Permanent Staff goes the highest tribute possible, for they fulfilled their duties, were real examples of Christian leadership, and functioned as a coordinate family unit throughout the entire summer. The leaders and directors of the camps and conferences planned and managed their programs to perfection, and each left an indelible impression in the lives of the hundreds of boys and girls who came to Vade Mecum. A record of the resulting Baptisms and Confirmations in the Church this year as a result of the influence and environment of Vade Mecum's leaders would be revealing, to say nothing of the interest and enthusiasm instilled in the hearts of young people for the Episcopal Church and its program for young people.

The Building Program—

The Farm program has been enlarged to include facilities for a small dairy to provide the Camps with Grade A milk in the summer. A lean-to shed to the barn, a milk house, silo, farm implement shed, and bull-pen have been erected with lumber salvaged from the flood last July. A 25 acre pasture has been fenced, and the soil improved for cattle grazing grasses. Funds for this work were received from the Vade Mecum Camps account, Vade Mecum Farms account, and the Winston-Salem Foundation.

Camp Equipment Needs—

Among the items which could be put to good use at Vade Mecum are the following: 80 arm desk chairs for class-rooms, rug for

lobby floor, 100 folding chairs, new office typewriter, 24 single sheets, 24 army blankets, Church flag, vacuum cleaner, regulation diving board, electric machinery for craft shop, and a sewing machine. Some of the projects have been adopted by various Church organizations.

Scholarships—

Many interested individuals, branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, Church Schools, and Laymen's Leagues, are providing camp fees. Some are given as awards for work accomplished in the Parish, many are given as half scholarships, and quite a number are given outright to be administered at the discretion of the Business Manager. Last year such contributions totaled \$240.75, and paid all or part camp fees for twenty-five boys and girls. These contributions have been gratefully received, and the donors are to be highly commended. Such gifts pay dividends in human life and character.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN MILITARY CAMP COMMISSION

Your Military Camp Commission was instructed as follows:

1. To be the official connecting link between the Diocese of North Carolina and the National Joint Commission on Army and Navy, headquarters No. 1 Joy Street, Boston, Mass., Chairman, the Rt. Rev. Henry C. Sherrill, D.D.

2. To familiarize itself with what other dioceses are doing for the soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., in training within their own boundaries.

3. To study the opportunity provided for the Church in the immediate environment of training centers in this diocese.

4. To be alert to the erection of new military training centers within the Diocese of North Carolina, that the Church may be forehanded in taking advantage of any opportunities for service in the camp environment.

We beg leave to report:

1. We have kept in touch with the National Joint Army and Navy Commission, receiving communications from time to time.

2. We have written to men in other dioceses, and in towns adjoining military camps, and have sought to have their advice.

3. We have made special study of the Church's opportunity as applied to the newest camp established in our diocese, that is at Camp Sutton, Monroe, N. C.

4. We have asked Bishop Penick to appoint a second committee to study the situation at the new camp to be established near Durham.

In connection with the above we make the following recommendations:

1. That a Army and Navy Commission be established for the duration of the war. That this commission be a clearing house for all Church men going into service. That is, each rector sends to this commission the names of his men going into service, and the commission in turn keeps a file, and informs the minister of the town adjoining the Camp. Also he keeps up with his transfers from camp to camp.

2. That a civilian Chaplain be secured to work in the three camps that we have within our borders. That this chaplain be the head of the Army and Navy Commission.

3. We further recommend:

(1) The names of all men going into service be sent to the minister near the camp to which the men are sent.

(2) That whole hearted financial support be given to the National Army and Navy Commission. This Commission is ready to help the ministers near our Military camps. They issue an Army and Navy Prayer Book, and also give other help to our men working with the soldiers and sailors.

(3) We recommend the full cooperation of the ministers near camps with the Church chaplains, and also with the post chaplain. There is always work that they can do. Many battalions do not have chaplains, and the men appreciate services.

(4) We recommend the full cooperation of our Church with the various committees set up in the towns near the camps.

(5) We recommend the full cooperation of our Church with the U. S. O. in the work being done for the soldiers and sailors when they come to town.

(6) We recommend the work among the families of the enlisted men, giving all possible encouragement in the participation in the activities of the Church.

(7) We recommend the entertainment of the men in service in the parish houses of the Churches near the camps. The use of the Parish Houses as recreational centers.

REPORT OF THE DEAF MISSION IN THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

I respectfully submit the following as the report of my official work for the year covering May 1, 1941 to May 1, 1942.

I have delivered 174 sermons and addresses. I have baptized two adults and one infant; have performed one marriage and one funeral.

I have presented six candidates for confirmation; two of whom were in the Church of Holy Comforter, Burlington; two in St. Andrew's Church, Greensboro; and two in St. Paul's Church, Winston-Salem.

Not counting the number of persons who attend our regular weekly service in Ephphatha Church, Durham, I have preached to about two thousand deaf persons within the year. All the stations which I visit show marked improvement, and we face the future with confidence.

There are two Churches for the use of the deaf people in our Diocese. They are Ephphatha Church, Durham, and St. Athanasius Church, Burlington. In other Dioceses in the United States, the deaf people have access to one Church only.

I have four licensed Lay Readers in our Diocese. They conduct services every week.

Whenever I have met our clergy in the fields which I have visited, they have been cordial and helpful. For this, I am very grateful. The deaf people in our State appreciate deeply the opportunities which the Episcopal Church has opened up to them. We thank you all.

The Executive Committee has adopted the following plans:

(a) Adopted a resolution providing for a plan to sponsor one entire week of Camp Tise at Vade Mecum, including a contribution of the sum of \$400.00 to this project.

(b) Adopted a resolution embodying a plan for underwriting a portion of the expense of Camp Delany (the Negro boys' camp located between Durham and Raleigh) and the granting of \$100.00 guarantee to this fund.

(c) Re-adopted with minor changes the by-laws and constitution heretofore used to govern the activities of the Diocesan League.

(d) Adopted plans for the Annual Vade Mecum conference of Laymen. (Note: This conference was originally scheduled for July 25-26, but because of conflict with the Kanuga Conference and for

other compelling reasons, the dates have been officially changed to August 29-30.)

(e) Adopted plans to assist, by various direct and indirect methods, in the general program for cooperation between the local parishes and the men in the armed forces.

(f) Adopted plans to assist the local rectors in raising the Diocesan quota of the Army and Navy Commissioner allotment of the Central Church.

(g) Considered plans whereby each Executive Committeeman may discharge more effectively his duties as supervisor of the parish Laymen's League activities within the several parishes in the district of the particular committeeman.

(h) Considered plans to assist the regular Diocesan committee in its efforts to achieve completion of the Vade Mecum Chapel at some time in the immediate future.

(i) Adopted plans with regard to expanding the organizational activities and creation of new leagues within the Diocese.

(j) Adopted plans to make more effective and interesting the participation by the Diocesan Laymen in the publicity made available by the North Carolina Churchman. In this connection it was decided to abandon the plan to use one page in each issue of the publication and to attempt as a substitute to induce the local League to transmit to the editor of the paper interesting and stimulating specific occurrences within the several parishes in the Diocese.

The President appointed appropriate committees to assume the responsibility for implementing various projects which were approved at the Executive Committee meeting on February 22, 1942.

In March the Negro district organization of the Diocesan League held its annual convention at the Church of the Redeemer in Greensboro. The meeting was successful and much enthusiasm was displayed by the various delegates.

A new Laymen's League has been recently formed in one parish within the Diocese, and plans are now being made for the organization of new leagues in other parishes.

The many national and international developments of a critical character which have occurred in recent months have apparently focused the attention of the men of the Church upon spiritual values. The Laymen's League affords an excellent opportunity for constructive service by the men of the Diocese in the common effort to build a more equitable and lasting structure of justice and spirituality for future generations. The Laymen's League definitely deserves an important place in the lives and activities of all Episcopal men.

FIRST DAY

Durham, N. C., May 11

The 127th Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina met in St. Philip's Church, Durham, at 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 11. The Bishop called the Convention to order and opened the session with prayer. Mr. William H. Ruffin, senior warden of St. Philip's, welcomed the Convention in behalf of the parish.

The secretary called the roll. A quorum being found present, the Bishop declared the Convention duly organized. On nomination the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence was elected secretary. He appointed the Rev. R. Emmet Gribbin, Jr., as his assistant.

The Bishop appointed a committee on credentials: The Rev. J. T. Carter, Mr. Marshall Staton and Mr. Hugh Craig.

Because of the change in the hours of convention, the rules of order were suspended and the order of business printed on the program was adopted.

The Bishop then read his annual address. (Appendix A)

It was moved and carried that the items calling for action in the Bishop's address be referred to a special committee. As this committee the Bishop appointed the Rev. C. E. B. Robinson, Mr. Ed Guthrie, and Mr. William Yates.

Mr. A. B. Andrews reported that as chancellor he had not been called upon for any decisions.

The Rev. James S. Cox presented the report of the Executive Council. The attached resolution, dealing with the Kittrell Fund, was adopted.

Mr. J. B. Cheshire read the report of the Standing Committee.

Mr. J. B. Cheshire then presented the report of the Trustees of the Diocese. This report was referred to a special committee, consisting of Mr. Ernest Hardin, Mr. Stephen Burroughs, and Mr. R. E. Clement.

Nominations were then made in accordance with the rules of order. The Convention then took a recess.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 12

At 7:30 a.m. the Holy Communion was celebrated in St. Philip's Church, Durham, with the Bishop as celebrant, assisted by the Rector of the parish, The Rev. D. W. Yates. The offering was received for the New York Bible and Common Prayer Book Society.

At 9:15 the Bishop called the Convention to order. Mr. J. H. Cutter presented the budget for the Church's Program for 1944. It was amended by the addition of \$150 for work at Wake Forest College and \$75 was added for the care of Negro orphans. The Budget, so amended, was then adopted.

The budget for Episcopal Maintenance was then considered. It was amended by reducing the appropriation for printing the Journal from \$550 to \$450 and by the addition of \$120 for the salary of the Bishop's secretary. With that amendment the Budget was adopted.

Mr. Allen Langston presented the report of the Treasurer of the Diocese. (Appendix B)

The Rev. J. A. Vaché presented the report of the committee on the State of the Church.

The Bishop then appointed the Canonical Committees as follows:

2. On State of the Church. Rev. Gray Temple, Rev. Rufus J. Womble, Dr. M. S. Broun, Mr. Z. E. Matthews, and Mr. Cecil D. Halliburton.

3. On New Parishes. Rev. Henry Johnston, Jr., Rev. Charles F. Wulf, Mr. Noble L. Clay, Mr. Richard H. Mason, and Mr. W. L. Marshall, Jr.

The Rev. J. M. Dick then offered the following resolution which was adopted:

RESOLVED: That the Diocesan Department of Christian Education be requested to investigate thoroughly the needs and opportunities for the services of an ordained clergyman to do student work at N. C. State College in Raleigh, especially among the Episcopal students, and to report their findings and recommendations to this Convention next Year.

The report of the work for Deaf was made in the sign language by Mr. James R. Fortune, who is carrying on the work that his father had for so many years.

The Bishop recognized the Rev. E. J. Arnold, secretary of the North Carolina Council of Churches, the Rev. Dr. Scanlon, the Rev. Henry Clark Smith. On motion these gentlemen were accorded seats in the Convention.

The Bishop then nominated as Examining Chaplains the Rev. Messrs. R. Bruce Owens, Alfred S. Lawrence,

John A. Wright, Edgar H. Goold, F. Craighill Brown, and I. Harding Hughes. The nominations were confirmed by the Convention. The Bishop also nominated to the Francis J. Murdoch Memorial Society the Rev. R. Bruce Owens, the Rev. I. Harding Hughes, and Mr. W. H. Hardin. The Convention confirmed these nominations.

Mr. A. B. Andrews spoke on the Church Pension Fund. A resolution was offered by the Rev. W. S. Turner thanking Mr. A. B. Andrews for his interest and help in getting the arrears paid in many instances. The resolution carried.

The Rev. C. E. B. Robinson, as chairman of the committee especially appointed to consider the Bishop's address, offered the following resolutions:

RESOLUTIONS OFFERED BY THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Resolved that the following revision of Canon 26, Section 7, be submitted to the Committee on Canons.

Rewrite Section 7, Canon XXVI to read as follows:

1. Communicants to be Reported.—Every confirmed person, resident of the Parish, who has been admitted to the Holy Communion, and has not withdrawn nor been suspended, shall be reported under "Confirmed persons" for the purposes of this Canon; and only those who have received the Holy Communion in the twelve months covered by the Parochial Report shall be considered as *Currently Active Communicants* and reported under the heading "Communicants."

2. Resolved that the Bishop appoint a Diocesan Ministerial Student Board of five members whose duty it will be to interview all prospective candidates for Holy Orders from this diocese, and to advise with the Bishop concerning their qualification for the Ministry.

3. Resolved that that portion of the Bishop's address concerned with the financial policy of the Church be referred to the Department of Finance with power to act.

4. Resolved that all congregations in this Diocese be requested to compile lists of all members of their congregations, both men and women, who are now in the armed and uniformed services of the United States and our Allies and copies of such lists be forwarded to the Historiographer of the Diocese.

Of these resolutions the first was referred to the Committee on Canons, the second was adopted, the third was referred to the Department of Finance, with power to act, and the fourth was adopted.

The Rev. I. H. Hughes reported for the Special Committee on Diocesan and Parochial Missions.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON DIOCESAN AND PAROCHIAL MISSIONS

In a meeting of this committee held on Feb. 16th, 1943, in the Parish House of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, N. C., attended by Rev. I. Harding Hughes, Chairman, Henry C. Bourne, Clifton L. Corpening, and Cleveland Thayer, the following report of its findings and recommendations was adopted:—

Status of a Parochial Mission in Respect to the Diocese:

Quota for the Church's Program, and assessment for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund should be on the same basis as that of any organized Mission; and its representation in the Convention should be the same as an Organized Mission. In case a Parochial Mission has less than ten (10) communicants, its status should be that of an Unorganized Mission.

Definition of an "Aided Parish."

A Parish that requires and receives such aid from the Diocese as is necessary for the maintenance of its immediate needs as prescribed in the items for calculating the quotas, shall be deemed an Aided Parish, and shall be entitled to one-half of Parish representation in the Convention; provided that any Parish which has sustained itself for fifty (50) years or more but due to changed economic conditions, is not wholly self-sustaining, may, in the discretion of the duly constituted Diocesan Committee, Council, or Body be continued from year to year as a Parish.

This report had been referred to the Committee on Canons. The Rev. R. B. Owens, as part of the report of the Committee on Canons, offered the following amendment to the Canons to satisfy the report of the Rev. I. H. Hughes.

Amend Canon XXVIII, Section 1 so that it will read as follows:

"Any Mission outside of the limits of an already existing Parish may be organized by the Bishop at his discretion, on application of residents of the neighborhood. A Mission, so organized, shall be

known as a Diocesan Mission, and having ten or more adult communicants, may, by making proper application to the Convention be admitted into union with it by vote of the Convention.

“Parochial Missions may be organized within the limits of an existing Parish by the Rector of said Parish, with the consent of the Bishop. A Parochial Mission, so organized, shall have the same rights, privileges, and obligations as Diocesan Missions.”

(The rest of the Canon, as at present)

This amendment was adopted.

On motion of the Rev. J. S. Cox, the whole matter of the status of Diocesan and Parochial Missions and of aided Parishes was referred to a special committee to be appointed by the Bishop and to report to the next Convention.

The Rev. F. B. Drane reported for the Army and Navy Commission. On motion, the greetings of the Convention were ordered to be sent to the Army and Navy chaplains from this Diocese. The Convention then proceeded to elections. The Bishop appointed as tellers the Rev. Ray Holder, the Rev. Hampton Price, Mr. William Wells, and Mr. James Fortune.

On motion the rules were suspended and it was agreed that those receiving the largest number of votes should be declared elected, and that in the case of the deputies to General Convention, those having the next highest should be declared alternates.

The Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., offered the following resolution as regards the quotas assessed against missions:

RESOLVED that the following plan to encourage missions to accept a reasonable quota, and to work to financial independence be adopted:

- I. The present plan of obtaining apportionments, as in use now. *Average the three factors below for one figure.*
 1. 50% of operating expenses for the previous year.
 2. Average amount given annually to Church's Program for last three years.
 3. \$2.75 per communicant for Organized Missions.
\$1.25 per communicant for Unorganized Missions.
- II. Accept, with full intent to pay, 50% of Item I for Church's Program quota.
- III. Accept as challenge item the other 50% (more or less) for increase to local minister's salary and/or travelling expense; and

notify Diocesan Department of Missions to reduce income from Diocesan Treasury by equal amount.

(This plan does not apply to Churches with Budget of over \$3000, and may not apply to Missions being served by clergy in self-supporting Parishes.)

The Rev. J. Q. Beckwith offered a substitute, embodying the same substance but clarifying the issue. The substitute was adopted.

The committee to which was referred the report of the Trustees made the following report:

Your Committee has examined the reports and audits of the Trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina and found them correct and in good order. This Committee recommends that audits and security appraisals be made to reflect a true condition as of March 31st each year instead of January 1st and 15th, in order that the exact financial condition might be brought closer to the Annual Convention date.

The Rev. R. Bruce Owens for the Committee on Canons made the following report:

Your Committee on Canons respectfully reports as follows:

1. In order to complete a change in the Constitution initiated at the Convention of 1942, Resolved: That article IX, section 3 of the Constitution be amended by changing the word "males" in line 2, to the word, "communicants."

2. That Article IX, section 3 of the Constitution be amended by striking out the two "provisos" in the last paragraph of the section.

3. That Canon XXVI, section 7 be amended by striking out the last paragraph, beginning with the words "But the Minister in Charge . . ."

4. Article 3, section 4. Strike out the "proviso" beginning in line 4.

5. Canon XVII, section 1. Strike out the sentence beginning in line 5, referring to the representation of the Young Peoples Service League.

6. Your committee was requested to amend Canon XVII, section 3 by adding after the words "social service" the words "college and youth work." Inasmuch as the Executive Council already has, under section 5, full authority to organize any new departments that it may think needed, the proposed amendment is unnecessary, and we ask to be discharged.

7. Canon XXV, section 1. "The Bishop and Standing Committee shall triennially make a survey of the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese. If after such survey, they shall deem it advisable that a Parish should be reduced to the status of an Organized Mission, or Organized Mission to the status of an unorganized Mission, they shall bring the matter to the attention of the Convention . . ." (The rest of the Canon as at present.)

(1) The amendment to the Constitution on the second reading was adopted by a vote by orders. Thirty-nine clergy voted aye, none voted no. Twenty-eight parishes voted aye and none no.

(2) This was passed on the first reading. (3) Action postponed. (4) Passed on first reading. (5) Adopted. (6) Adopted, and committee discharged from further consideration. (7) Adopted.

On motion, General Convention was memorialized to define what is a communicant for parochial reports and statistical purposes.

On motion of Mr. J. H. Cutter, the Episcopal Maintenance Fund for St. Andrews, Greensboro, for 1942 was remitted.

The Rev. Edmund Berkeley made an incomplete report on the Lenten offering.

The Rev. William S. Turner and the Rev. F. Craighill Brown spoke on what had been done in the preaching missions of the Forward in Service Program.

The Rev. I. Harding Hughes called the attention of the Convention to the half century of service given to the Church in the Diocese by the Rev. Robert Bruce Owens. The Convention stood as a mark of its affection and appreciation of all that Mr. Owens has done in these many years.

On motion the secretary was instructed to send the greetings of the Convention to the Rev. William J. Gordon, Jr., now in Seward, Alaska.

It was moved and carried that the Executive Council of the Diocese be empowered to handle the insurance of the Mission property. It was also moved and carried that in

assigning assessments, the insurance should be listed separately from the Episcopal Maintenance.

On motion of the Rev. I. Harding Hughes the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED: That this Convention extend to St. Philip's Parish, its Rector and other clergy, its vestry, Woman's Auxiliary and all members, our heartfelt thanks for the gracious hospitality extended us.

APPENDIX A

ADDRESS AND JOURNAL OF THE BISHOP

Address of the Bishop

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

As I welcome you to the One Hundred and Twenty-Seventh Annual Convention of this Diocese, I have in mind the first word with which Christ greeted a gathering of his disciples after his Resurrection. "Peace be unto you," He said. This was His salutation to the infant Church. This is His benediction upon the modern Church. Peace is what He achieved through the things that He suffered then. Peace is what He bestows upon those who suffer with Him now. This is what we yearn for most, for our distracted selves, our endangered loved ones, our troubled Church, our anxious country and our broken world. As we assemble for this Convention, it is with the earnest prayer upon our hearts that God will grant to us such a purity of faith that all we think and say and do, as individuals, as Churchmen and as citizens, may issue in that peace which the world cannot give. As St. James puts it: "The wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable."

It would be gratifying to us all if the circumstances under which we are meeting favored an historical review of what God has wrought in this parish since it was founded by the Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, Jr., in 1878 while he was serving his Diaconate at Chapel Hill. It would be an edifying and inspiring retrospect, a story of foundations firmly laid, of consistent expansion by the Church as the city developed through the years. It would be a record made eloquent by the sacrifice and devotion of the clergy and laity who have wrought and died in this place, whose memory we revere and whose good deeds do follow them. As we meet in this significant environment, we are conscious of our responsibility as inheritors of a noble past to perpetuate those eternal values to which this parish has borne signal witness for sixty-five faithful years.

NECROLOGY

In 1942, the Diocese suffered the loss of five clergymen by death. In my Convention address of last year, I referred to the Rev. Francis Joyner whom God called to a higher ministry on February 28th.

The Rev. Henry Felix Kloman died suddenly on August 29th while he was supplying for the summer in the Diocese of Newark. Less than two months before, he had retired from the active ministry after forty-seven years of continuous service. Mr. Kloman came to this Diocese in the fall of 1936 upon the call of the Trustees of St. Mary's School to fill the office of Chaplain. He brought to this position a broad experience acquired in many responsible rectorships in Maryland, Virginia, Oregon, North Dakota, and a Chaplaincy during the First World War. For six rich years he gave himself unreservedly to his school duties in the Chapel, the class room and in his pastoral relationships with the students. With the assistance of his wife, who preceded him in death by only a few months, he made a gracious home of his Chaplain's residence and filled it with an affectionate parental influence for which he will be remembered and respected by the students and patrons of St. Mary's School.

On October 16th, the Rev. Jacob Richard Jones, retired Negro Priest, died after a long illness in Asheville. A native of South Carolina, he attended St. Augustine's School in Raleigh, and was ordained by the late Bishop Guerry in 1908. Most of his active ministry was spent in mission work in South Carolina. He served in this Diocese as Priest in Charge of All Saints, Warrenton, from 1928 until 1932, when he became non-parochial and moved to Asheville. Despairing of regaining his health, he retired under the Pension Fund on March 1, 1942, and within a few months death ended his intermittent and pathetic ministry to his people.

Before the month had gone, death came again to one of the most beloved clergymen of this Diocese. On October 27th, while calling upon a parishioner of Ephphatha Church for the Deaf in Durham, the Rev. Roma Coxey

Fortune heard the clear voice of Him whom he had faithfully served breaking through the silence that had always clung around him. Mr. Fortune's ministry to the Deaf is one of the most significant chapters in the history of this Diocese. It began in the heart of the Rev. Sidney S. Bost, one-time rector of this parish, who was touched by the religious needs of these isolated people, many of whom were employed by the tobacco industry in this city. He familiarized himself with the sign language, and trained Mr. Fortune for the ministry. In May, 1918, Bishop Cheshire ordained Mr. Fortune to the Diaconate, and advanced him to the Priesthood eleven years later. The following year, in response to a special request of Bishop Cheshire, Ephphatha Church was erected in Durham. Meanwhile, congregations of the Deaf had been formed in Burlington, where St. Athanasius' Church was renovated and turned over to them by the Church of the Holy Comforter in that city. Other groups were organized in Greensboro, Winston-Salem and other cities of the Piedmont. To all of them, Mr. Fortune ministered with unflagging zeal and effectiveness. Considering the handicap under which he labored, Mr. Fortune's ministry was not only dramatic and appealing, but far reaching in its extent and substantial in results. We honor him as one of the outstanding pioneers of the Church to our brethren who live in perpetual silence. We never heard the sound of his voice, but we never failed to catch the muted sweetness of his personality, and the message of a life that was eloquent above words.

On November 19, the Rev. Jacob Frederick Burg, retired Priest of this Diocese since September 1, 1926, died in Salisbury after a lingering illness. Mr. Burg was a native of Massachusetts who came south in 1912. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Cheshire, July 11, 1915, and advanced to the Priesthood five years later. His ministry was confined to mission work, first at St. Timothy's, Union County, then at All Saints', Hamlet, and in Rowan County. During the sixteen years of his retirement, his advanced age and increasing infirmity prevented his at-

tending Diocesan Conventions and other Church gatherings. Circumstances constrained him to dwell apart, and much in solitude, with his memories and his books and a small circle of loved ones, and yet in constant devotion to Him who rewards in secret, and who gives "light at eventide."

SUMMARY OF OFFICIAL ACTS

Within the Diocese I made 120 Visitations, confirmed 687 persons, celebrated the Holy Communion 35 times, baptized one infant, officiated at 3 Weddings and 6 Funerals and 45 other services. I ordained one candidate to the Diaconate and advanced 3 Deacons to the Priesthood. I laid the Corner Stone of one Parish House, dedicated one Parish House Annex and consecrated three Church buildings. I licensed 35 Lay Readers, attended 69 Committee, Trustee and Board meetings, held 143 Conferences with groups or individuals, preached 103 times and delivered 42 lectures and addresses.

Of the number confirmed, 88 were Negroes and 6 were from our deaf congregations.

Bishop Darst and Bishop Gribbin confirmed 4 and 5 persons, respectively, making a total of 696 in this Diocese for 1942.

Outside the Diocese I made two Visitations for Bishop Darst, confirmed 26 people, preached 5 times, attended 4 committee meetings, officiated at one Wedding and took part in the Consecration of a Bishop.

The year 1942 marked a number of significant events in the life of our Diocesan Institutions. The Centennial of the founding of St. Mary's School was appropriately observed with impressive ceremonies. St. Augustine's College was recognized and rated as a Grade A College by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. It is with pleasure and pride that we acknowledge the eminent position that these two institutions deservedly occupy among the educational agencies of our Church. We extend our congratulations to the Presidents of these two Church Colleges, Mrs. Cruikshank and Mr. Goold, and record our appreciation for their conspicuous leadership.

A progressive step was taken by St. Agnes' Hospital when it was separated from St. Augustine's College and incorporated with its own property, real estate, building and equipment. The new Superintendent is Dr. A. W.

Tucker, formerly of St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai. Closely associated with him is a competent board of managers composed entirely of laymen under the chairmanship of Mr. Alexander Webb of Raleigh. Worthy of special note also was the consecration of three Church buildings during the year, all of them in the mission field: the Church of the Good Shepherd, Asheboro, St. Andrew's, Trollinwood, and Calvary Chapel, Burlington.

The statistical report of the year is disappointing in one respect. The number of communicants has declined since 1941 and, for the first time, I believe, since I became Bishop, the Diocese of North Carolina will appear before the Church with a net loss of approximately one hundred communicants. This apparent retrogression in our communicant strength coincides with an unusually high number of candidates for Confirmation, that is, 37 above the ten-year average. I cannot help feeling a deep concern over this unfortunate condition, especially when the Church should be making every effort to increase her numerical strength. There has been a considerable shifting in our population by reason of the war and other demands of our nation's crisis. And yet, in spite of this ebb and flow, it is regrettable that the Church over as large an area as a diocese, and over as much time as one full year, should show a loss in communicant strength. This loss seems to be explained by the revision of parochial statistics in a few places to such an extent that the substantial gains in most congregations were more than nullified. I do not question the accuracy of these local revisions. Statistics, to be of value must represent facts, regardless of how welcome or unwelcome the facts might be. However, since this falling off is a first occurrence so far as this Diocese is concerned, I suggest that the reasons for it be determined by a Special Committee, and that the Committee on Canons be requested to define the terms "Communicant" and "Confirmed Person" as nearly as possible for the guidance of our clergy in compiling their annual reports.

A second question of greater importance is the concern

we all feel over the interruption in the Church's supply of ministerial candidates. The normal flow of students from college to seminary has stopped. If the war should continue for several years, the usual stream of Candidates for Holy Orders would be cut off at its source. As death and age and disability claim the older men, how shall they be replaced, when this generation of youth, with its potential ministry, is being diverted into government service? Reluctant as I am to admit it, the only answer I now see to this question is a recent classification of the Navy wherein a student who is willing to serve as Chaplain may attend college for two years, and then enter a seminary for his theological training. Other professions are being compelled to submit to a similar curtailment of academic education. The Church should conform to this condition of our national emergency even though the professional equipment of its leaders is thereby abridged. In addition to these accelerated requirements, a serious feature of this plan lies in the fact that High School graduates or College Freshmen, with all the immaturity that their inexperience involves, are compelled to make a life decision when they are incompetent to do so. In anticipation, therefore, of the difficult situations that may arise, as very young men make application to the government for occupational deferment as pre-theological students, I should like for this Convention to create a Diocesan Ministerial Student Board whose duty it will be to interview all prospective candidates for Holy Orders from this diocese, and to advise with the Bishop concerning their qualification for the Ministry.

The third subject to which I wish this Convention might give thought is concerned with the financial policy of the Church. It has been suggested to me by business men of this Diocese whose judgment I respect that now is the time for Vestries and other responsible bodies to pay local debts as rapidly as possible, and to create endowments or reserves against the day when the income of our people will fall below its present level. This is a simple matter of forethought and of provision for an uncertain

future. We want to be prepared against the shock of adjustment which the Church, like other institutions in this country, will be called upon to sustain in course of time. It would not be wise for us to disregard now the lessons that the Church should have learned well in the bitter experience of a fairly recent past. What I am proposing might be done in connection with the Every Member Canvass in the fall, or by a special effort prior to that date. Whenever or however it may be undertaken, it should be only after all other obligations have been met in full, including the maintenance of the missionary structure of our Church, at home and abroad, and also a generous response to the many demands of a nation at war.

Finally, I can only touch upon the subject that is uppermost in our thoughts and lies most heavily on our hearts. I refer to the Church's ministrations to the men in the armed services of our country. I doubt if there is a Church in this Diocese, even to the smallest Mission, that does not have its Honor Roll. These names are familiar locally, but they are entitled to a wider acquaintance. Would it not be appropriate and desirable to bring all of these precious lists together and to compile a Diocesan Roll of Honor? Who are the Churchmen of North Carolina who fought under the Stars and Bars? Who are the men who served in World War I? The fact that a great Book of Remembrance was being written, with all of their names inscribed therein, might indicate to our sons and daughters in uniform that we appreciate the sacrifice they are making, and that we want to perpetuate the memory of the service they are rendering.

At the end of his masterful chapter on the Resurrection of the dead, St. Paul's climax sounds more like a shout than an argument. "Thanks be to God," he cries, "who giveth us the victory through our Lord, Jesus Christ." Then he adds significantly, "Wherefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast." There is the logic of his unmoveableness. It rests upon the unconquered Christ. In his invincibility is our confidence and our peace. Washing-

ton Gladden wrote, "In the darkest night of the year, when the stars had all gone out," and gave us the secret of his "steadfastness":

"When the anchors that faith has cast
Are dragging in the gale,
I am quietly holding fast
To the things that cannot fail."

The Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina held four meetings during the year 1942, as follows:

On May 8, 1942, the Committee met at the office of the Secretary, Raleigh, N. C., at 12:30 P.M., and took the following action:

Gave its consent, at the request of the Presiding Bishop, to the ordination and consecration of the following Missionary Bishops, elected on the fourth and fifth of February preceding the meeting:

1. The Reverend James Moss Stoney, Missionary Bishop of New Mexico.
2. The Very Reverend Frank Archibald Rhea, D.D., Missionary Bishop of Idaho.
3. The Right Reverend Norman Spencer Binstead, D.D., retired, Missionary Bishop of the Philippine Islands.
4. The Reverend William Fisher Lewis, Missionary Bishop of Nevada.

Consent was given to the election of a Suffragan Bishop for the Diocese of Virginia.

Mr. Ray Holder, Postulant, was recommended to the Bishop as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

The following Deacons were recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Priesthood:

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend Herman R. Page to be Bishop of the Diocese of Northern Michigan.

Consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the

Reverend Oliver James Hart, D.D., LL.D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Pennsylvania.

On November 30, 1942, the Committee met at the office of the Secretary, Raleigh, N. C., and took the following action:

Mr. Ray Holder, Candidate for Holy Orders, at the request and with the consent of the Bishop, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate, in accordance with Canon 7, Paragraph II, his time being shortened to the minimum for the reason that he is in his thirtieth year of age and has had considerable experience in public speaking and teaching.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

For Information:

Since the last Diocesan Convention four meetings of the Diocesan Executive Council have been held: July 2, 1942; September 23, 1942; January 13, 1943; April 28, 1943.

At the July meeting the Bishop appointed the following members to the various departments of the Council.

Finance: Messrs. R. H. Lewis, Chairman; J. H. Cutter, and Alexander B. Andrews.

Missions: Rev. F. Craighill Brown, Chairman; Mrs. William J. Gordon, Mr. Cleveland Thayer, and Mr. John H. Clark.

Christian Education: Rev. C. Alfred Cole, Chairman; Rev. J. A. Wright, Mr. Collin McKinne, and Miss Rhettta Aughtry.

Christian Social Relations: Rev. Willis G. Clark, D.D., Chairman; Rev. C. E. B. Robinson, and Mrs. Julius A. Mackie.

Promotion: Rev. James S. Cox, Chairman; Mrs. Urban T. Holmes, Messrs. Hobart T. Steele, and Arthur L. Tyler.

The quotas for the Church's Program Fund for 1943, by action of the Convention, were set at the same figures for 1942. The 1943 assessments of Parishes and Missions for the Episcopal Maintenance Fund were found by taking 9½% of Current Operating Expenses for the year 1941, taken from the 1942 Journal. The assessments for the three Educational Institutions were fixed at the same as last year.

The churches in the Diocese pledged \$55,211.47 toward the 1943 Church Program Fund.

The Department of Missions carried on its usual good work, and in addition, began a survey of the Parishes in the Diocese by making a survey of the city of Charlotte, which resulted in the establishment of a new field of work there. The department is continuing its work, and Winston-Salem has been designated as the next place for survey.

The Department of Christian Education has recommended to the Council the creation of a new department to be known as the Department of Youth, and which will include all the projects under the old Department of Christian Education, as shown in the 1942 Diocesan Journal, on pages 112 and 113, except items 8, 9, 10 and 11, excluding the "Promotional Work of the Y.P.S.L."

The Council has attempted to discharge its responsibilities concerning the matters referred to it at last year's Diocesan Convention:

1. The survey of Parishes has been initiated as indicated above.

2. The matter of dividing the Diocese into Convocations was considered by a special committee in the Council and reported on adversely, and the Council has continued the special committee in order that the problem might be studied further.

For Action:

1. The Church's Program and Episcopal Maintenance Fund Budgets will be presented hereafter by the Department of Finance.

2. The following resolution is submitted by the Council for approval by the Convention:

Resolved, The Executive Council hereby recommends to the Diocesan Convention that the Trustees of the Diocese be directed to engage counsel and bring suit for an accounting and settlement of the financial matters of the Ladies' Aid Society of St. James' Church, Kittrell, N. C., a trust fund, the income of which is payable to the support of a mission in the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE LAYMEN'S LEAGUE

By reason of travel restrictions and other unavoidable circumstances created by the national war effort, the Laymen's League has been compelled to curtail many of its normal activities and functions. The most significant departures from the regular program of the League were the omissions of the annual Diocesan League Convention and the annual Laymen's conference at Vade Mecum.

Notwithstanding the limited character of its official program, the League has nevertheless maintained an active and effective existence through the medium of a strong and enthusiastic Executive Committee. The League continued to sponsor and assist the various leagues within the several parishes, and also maintained its program of sponsoring Camp Tise at Vade Mecum and the corresponding camp (Camp Delany) for negro boys at the Crabtree project between Durham and Raleigh. In addition to total contributions of \$500.00 to these camp projects, the League through local efforts made some contribution to the Chapel Fund at Vade Mecum.

Although the stultifying and circumscribing effect of the war is still operating to restrict many civic and spiritual activities, there seems to be a growing sentiment among the members of the Diocesan League that there should be no further retrenchment in activities, and that the League should attempt to restore as rapidly as possible the full scope of its normal program. Accordingly, the Executive Committee recently voted to reinstate the Laymen's League conference at Vade Mecum, and plans are now being made for an enthusiastic week-end gathering on July 31st-August 1st. The League has also officially agreed to continue its support of Camp Tise and Camp Delany, and a committee has been appointed to handle the details of collecting the necessary funds and collaborating generally with the directors of Camp Tise and Camp Delany. It is too early to make a definite prediction with respect to the next Diocesan Convention of the League, but it seems reasonable to conclude that unless serious conditions intervene, the League will probably resume in January, 1944, its annual convention.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

1. The now so obvious fact of the stability of the Church lies in its awareness of its true Catholic nature, fully conscious of its continuity with the past, its divine mission today, and its ultimate triumph through the power of God. Your Committee recognizes the instability and failure of the Continental Churches of Europe, yet in contrast, we take full cognizance of the vitality, alertness and effectiveness of the Church of England, in dealing with the onslaught of the forces of evil. We believe the ultimate establishment of the Kingdom of God on this earth, depends upon the Holy Catholic Church, and upon no other institution. This is a responsibility and a fact which we have been reluctant to proclaim for too long. In the past, such a statement would have been looked upon as a conceit. However, today it is appreciated by people everywhere, who are seeking for the cure of the world's ills through the Church of Christ.

2. The Church has a special testimony to the world, in respect of its social and economic life, and therefore must influence public life, constantly seeking ways to express Christian principles through these channels.

In view of this statement, the Church must prepare her clergy and laymen by all the means at her command. A lay member of your Committee feels that the weak link of the Church lies not especially with its clergy but with the laity, who fail to realize their part in this World Evangelism.

Christian Education:

The following suggestions are offered as to how, in part, this may be carried out:

Consideration be given to having membership on the Department of Christian Education equally divided between Parishes and Missions, and that the Curriculum Committee of the Department state separately the needs of the Mission Churches. Our reason for this suggestion is based upon the fact that our Mission Churches are dormant, due to the lack of a well planned program which would properly train our people and keep them faithful to the Church, whether they remain in their own mission or move to another environment. An adjustment is needed, on the part of the youth, to college life and to city life. The transitional period between high school and the final adjustment is the gap where the Church is losing her power, and this has not been given satisfactory consideration for a long time.

We believe that greater stress should be put on work with young married people, by teachings based upon the fundamentals of the Church. All pre-marital instruction should include definite and simplified instruction on the Church, appealing to their church

loyalty and obligation to remain faithful to the Church and rear their children in the Church.

We feel that the Department of Christian Education should be the directing agency in guiding our Parishes and Missions, as well as stimulating them in studies which will fit the Church to do her share in meeting those who are seeking for the cure of the world's ills within the Body of Christ.

Too little attention has been paid to the following subjects:

Church Union.

Just and Durable Peace—A sporadic effort was made in some Auxiliaries.

The Ecumenical Movement of the World Council.

Juvenile Delinquency—A very great and dangerous problem.

These are just a few subjects pertinent to the day.

Greater study must be given to the report of the National Council's "Four Guiding Principles" in relation to work of our Church among Negroes. Your Committee would, therefore, suggest that all matters in this section of the Report be referred to the Department of Christian Education. Your Committee feels that it would be a wise investment if the Diocese could see its way clear to employ a full-time Religious Education Director.

The War and the Church:

It is quite evident there has been a tremendous shift of population within the Diocese to various defense areas and camps. The movement presents a problem which we must cope with wisely, and seek to keep in touch with our migrant members so that after hostilities cease we can help them readjust their church life.

Instruct Them in the Church:

The Church should carefully consider the needs of our workers today, striving to adjust her hours of services to meet the needs of the various groups—often people work on shifts where they find it impossible to attend the regular services. Short services during the week, for many now work six days a week with a day off during the week instead of the first day.

The problem of bereavement. More and more, as the war goes on, the Church will be called upon to visit and console. The Committee would like to commend the literature available from the Forward in Service Commission on this subject.

5. Your Committee would like to call the Convention's attention both to the Ember Days and the Theological Education Sunday, as occasions for informing our people of the Christian Ministry, stressing the Church's method of selection and training, and that we also appeal to the youth of the church to prayerfully consider the call to the sacred ministry.

6. *Forward in Service:*

The most evident result of the work of Forward in Service Committee in the Diocese has been the Preaching Mission held in many of the Parishes and Missions during the Epiphany Pre-Lenten season.

These Preaching Missions conducted by our own Diocesan clergy were most helpful and have undoubtedly contributed to the spiritual welfare of the Diocese as a whole, not only to the laity but to the clergy as well.

Other less evident but cumulative as important have been the Clergy Conference and Retreat held at Vade Mecum last fall to prepare the clergy for the mission, and the constant flow of material from the National Council to the parish and mission clergy which has proved invaluable in helping all our clergy and people to keep abreast of the plans and best thought of the Church as a whole. Wherever the Forward in Service plans have been adopted and enthusiastically carried out, there has always been spiritual progress.

The Forward in Service Committee plans to hold another Clergy Conference and Retreat this autumn. The prayers of the people of the Diocese are asked that we may truly go forward in service.

REPORT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION

To the Members of the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage:

It is my extreme pleasure to report to the Board at this meeting the accomplishments of the best year the Orphanage has had for some time. We should feel very proud of the progress that has been made during the past year and of the fine future that lies before us. The Orphanage has never been in better condition and I believe has the confidence not only of the church but of the people of the state in a way that it has never had before. Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant have done a splendid job in building up and improving the Orphanage in every phase of its work. This improvement and development has not only been in the material field but in the character building and spiritual sphere as well. Those who have been on the Executive Committee and the Board as well, have but to think back to see the improvement that has been made. This is no reflection in the least upon any previous management

of the Orphanage but is to be accounted for by reason of the fact that the Orphanage had reached a crisis where it needed to be revitalized, you might say, and Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant were fine selections as directors and managers in bringing about this result. So, I repeat that our institution is in excellent condition and I am pleased that the excellence of our institution is not only appreciated by the members of our church but also by the public generally as has been recently shown by their willingness to contribute so generously to the Thompson Orphanage. Now, without making a long report, I wish to point out briefly the progress that has been made along several lines.

First: Repairs to the cottages and buildings. During the year we have spent the sum of \$2,695.14 in permanent improvements and repairs on our various buildings. All this money for these repairs coming out of our current fund except about \$300.00 which was taken from the building fund. The larger items of this expense were as follows: Furnace, \$789.61; farm, \$206.13; laundry, \$197.29; so during the year the buildings have been put in good state of repair and are in the best condition they have been for some time.

Second: Buying a herd of cattle, building a barn, and purchasing farm equipment. During the first part of the year we had secured enough funds from sale of Orphanage property to build a barn, but we had no cows to put in it, which was a rather fatal weakness. One of our good Methodist brethren, Mr. George Dowdy, became interested in the Orphanage and, when this situation was explained to him by Mr. Whisnant, he stated that he was going to raise the funds to buy this herd of cows. He held a lunch meeting with a selected group present, some of whom were Episcopalians, and some not, and distributed cards to this group. Under his direction, we all became active and were told it would take at least \$4000.00 to purchase a herd of cows. Under Mr. Dowdy's skillful and enthusiastic management, this barn fund finally amounted to \$4,170.00. As a result eight fine Jersey cows were purchased from the Morrison farm and we now have eight cows and four calves, which is a very valuable herd for the Orphanage. The cows are of the finest breed and are saving us much money in purchasing milk and butter and at the same time giving us much finer milk and butter than we probably could purchase. In addition, a \$1,000.00 tractor has been given to the Orphanage, thanks to Mr. M. E. Pierson, Frank M. Shannonhouse, Ralph Bouligney, and Fritz Seifert, President of the Hudson Silk Hosiery Mills, who is a Lutheran. These gentlemen purchased the tractor and gave it to the Orphanage, which is, of course, very essential both in producing food for the cows and also for general farm work. In connection with the operation of the dairy and farm, an ensilage cutter has also been purchased for \$375.00, a sterilizer for \$275.00, and we still have in our cattle fund the sum of \$1,-

022.22, which can be used for any real needy purpose in connection with the dairy or farm. So, the building of the barn and the purchasing of the herd and the receipt of the necessary machinery to make the operation of the dairy a success is a notable contribution to the efficient and economic operation of the Orphanage.

Revolving Fund: Some of us have thought for some years that we should avoid borrowing money at the bank if it is possible for us to do so. As you know, it has been necessary for us to start, say about the first of September, and borrow some money from the bank each year to carry us through until receipt of the Thanksgiving Offering. This we have been doing and have always wiped the slate clean by paying all indebtedness on receipt of the Thanksgiving Offering, but this has necessarily handicapped us throughout the year. This year, for instance, we borrowed only \$4,500.00, which has been already paid back out of the Thanksgiving Offering. Some of us have felt that if we could get a revolving fund from which the Orphanage could borrow and pay itself back all current funds on receipt of the Thanksgiving Offering, it would be a much healthier condition financially. With this in mind, we got up a letter, which I had the pleasure of drafting, setting forth this desire on our part, to raise the revolving fund and giving the needs for same, which letter was written, not to Episcopalians alone, but to many members of other denominations. The letter was framed so as not to be an appeal to anyone because he or she was a member of the Episcopal Church. I am glad to report that so far we have received from this letter in round numbers about \$2,500.00 which has come from different parts of the state, and I feel that before the year is over we will receive many more contributions to this fund. The appeal was made so that if the gift could not be made during 1942, it might be made during 1943.

Special Gifts: In addition to the contributions above mentioned, we have received \$1,395.06 in special gifts during the year which is higher than we have received for some time.

Thanksgiving Offering: We are gratified to report that our Thanksgiving Offering was \$2,200.00 larger than last year which, of course, is very encouraging and should help us operate this year without borrowing any money from any source. The success of the campaign was due largely to the work done by Mrs. Francis Clarkson, Chairman of the Publicity Committee and the fine help she received through the Orphanage office under the direction of Mr. Whisnant.

So, from the standpoint of finances, we are in the best position we have been for a long time, and it is due in a large measure to the generosity that has been shown the Orphanage during the past year which I attribute to the renewed interest that not only our church but the public generally has taken in the Orphanage.

Now as to the character building features of the Orphanage

program, I am satisfied that the improvement here has been just as marked as in the field of finance.

First, the children have been taught by Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant that the Orphanage is their home and that they must feel that is such and they should make their contribution to make it a happy and beneficial one. In order to give them an opportunity to serve the Orphanage at the same time helping to build their own characters, they have provided for the boys to work on the farm, in the dairy and the general work in and around the whole Orphanage premises. It is most gratifying to visit the Orphanage from time to time and see just what fine work the boys are doing. Mr. Whisnant made a statement to the Executive Committee that he had already trained eleven milkers before he had received his herd of Jerseys. I suppose he trained them on the few scrubs he had before the purchase of the herd. As to the girls, they are given work in the laundry, do sewing and in the summer, canning. Mr. Whisnant says that one of the needs of the Orphanage at the present time is a first class canning unit.

Spiritual Development: The services are held by Mr. Wheeler at 8:15 every Sunday. The children either go to St. Peter's or St. Martin's Sunday School. Some go at 9:30 and some at 11:00. This is a very fine spiritual atmosphere and is just what must be kept around the Orphanage if it is to fulfill the original purpose of not only raising the children placed in the Orphanage but developing them as fine and moral and Christian children.

We now have eighty-three children, forty-five girls and thirty-eight boys. At this time last year we had seventy children, thirty-one boys and thirty-nine girls, so we have increased thirteen during the past year. As you know we have felt that a total census of ninety was probably all that we should have in the Orphanage at one time although, of course, we could take care of one hundred if it became necessary. It is interesting to note that the average age of the children is getting younger. Whereas in 1941 we had ten children over eighteen, in 1942, we had three over eighteen, and 1943, no children as old as eighteen. The oldest children here are three boys and three girls, each seventeen years of age.

Personnel of the Orphanage: The Orphanage has now eighteen employees, including Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant, Mr. Whisnant's secretary, the general handy-man, the farmer, the cooks, the maid, which makes a total of eighteen with the matrons, which I consider not a large personnel for the operation of an institution which has to take care of upwards of ninety children. This is very much in line with the size of personnel of institutions of this type generally. May I say that the house matrons have done splendidly during the year and have rendered a fine service to the institution during 1942, and the services of all employees of the institution have been satisfactory.

This concludes my report. I wish to say again that we have had

a most successful year and the Executive Committee is pleased to be able to report to the Board of Managers the improvement and development that has taken place in the Orphanage during the past year and which we feel confident will continue during 1943, as it is in excellent condition at the present time and is in splendid hands.

REPORT OF GOOD SAMARITAN HOSPITAL

The Good Samaritan Hospital completed fifty-four years of usefulness in 1942, reaching a peak in service in all departments. Our total number of patients and patient days was the largest in the history of the institution.

During the year a nursery for premature infants was made possible by a bequest from the late J. Renwick Wilkes. Also, a second operating room was installed and equipped.

In May a class of six student nurses was graduated from our Grade A training school.

We wish to record our appreciation of the gifts and interest of the Duke Endowment, St. Peter's Church, St. Martin's Church, and our many friends who have enabled us to carry on during the year.

REPORT OF ST. AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE

May 12, 1943

During the past year 201 college students have been enrolled. This is a decrease of about 10 per cent as compared with last year's enrollment due to the drafting of a number of young men. The same percentage of decrease is found in the general college enrollment throughout the country. The students come from sixteen states and the District of Columbia. About 50 per cent of them are from North Carolina, about 30 per cent from other states in the South, and about 20 per cent from other parts of the United States.

An outstanding event in the academic life of the institution was its recognition as a Class "A" College by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools at its meeting in Memphis, Tennessee, last December. This recognition came partly as the result of the excellent record made by numerous St. Augustine's graduates in graduate and professional schools and partly as the result of increased financial resources and advanced training of the faculty.

On January 9th and 10th was celebrated the seventy-fifth anniversary of the opening of the institution in January, 1868, with an initial enrollment of four students. Outstanding events of the celebration were the address by Dr. Ambrose Caliver, Senior Specialist in Negro Education in the United States on Post-war Problems of Negro Colleges, and the Anniversary Service with the sermon by the Presiding Bishop of the Church, Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, D.D. St. Augustine's has had a War Activities Council since shortly after the declaration of war. Faculty and students have united in efforts to promote an intelligent understanding of the war and its objectives and to maintain a suitable morale.

An Enlisted Reserve Corps has been maintained at the college and numerous graduates and former students have already received commissions in the armed forces.

The church work at the college has gone as usual. The Woman's Auxiliary, both junior and senior branches, the Laymen's League, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and the Altar Guild have all been functioning on the campus. Twelve students were confirmed, four of them had recently been baptized in the Chapel. The Lenten offering for missions totaled over \$250. Among the conferences that have met on the campus have been the North Carolina Negro College Conference, the Annual Conference of the Colored Intercollegiate Athletic Association and the Annual Meeting of the Crown and Sceptre Scholarship Society, a statewide organization of Negro High School students which was founded and is fostered by St. Augustine's College. Plans are being made for the Annual St. Augustine's Conference for Church Workers,

May 31 to June 4. A conference of Negro Girl Leaders will be held on the college campus later in June.

Through the generous aid of the American Church Institute for Negroes the college has been able to purchase additional equipment for the Science Department and also for the Department of Physical Education. The work in both of these departments has been emphasized and enlarged as part of the War Training Program.

One unsatisfactory feature of the year's work has been a student restlessness due largely to the extension of the Selective Service Act to include young men 18 years of age and over and to the imminent calling to active service of those who had joined the Enlisted Reserve Corps of the college. Young men who see no apparent opportunity to continue their education and who feel that they may be called to leave college at any time are not in a normal state of mind and their conduct often reflects their uncertain and uneasy situation.

The future of educational institutions for the next few years will continue to be uncertain and their problems will be many and difficult.

We ask the friends of St. Augustine's College to give her their unstinted support as she faces the future.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY IN THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

The Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina was held in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, May 5th and 6th.

121 delegates were present, and 16 members of the Executive Board, besides a goodly number of visitors.

The spirit of serious concern about the Church's prior claims on our time and energy was reflected in all reports given. The Convention was deeply thankful for the report from the United Thank Offering Custodian of a sum slightly over \$8,000 for the year 1942, and at the presentation service on Thursday morning the sum of \$4,618.66 was offered as the Spring Ingathering for 1943. Money offered is by no means a standard of achievement, but it is gratifying to know that last year's budget was met in full and a like amount of \$7,400 pledged for 1944.

In all departments reports showed the Auxiliary to be faithful and forward-looking. Plans are completed for the Annual Conference and School of Teacher Training at Vade Mecum, July 26-31.

Since the diocesan Negro social worker, Theodosia Hall, has

transferred her services to a larger field in Good Samaritan Hospital, the Auxiliary expressed the hope that a successor for her could be found to carry on similar work wherever in the diocese the Bishop and Council felt there was greatest need.

The Convention heard with warm interest the account by Miss Sarah Cheshire of student work among the Episcopal students at State College, and expressed by a rising vote of thanks their appreciation of what Miss Cheshire and Dr. Kenneth Cameron have done in building up this work.

The resignation of the President, Mrs. U. T. Holmes, Jr., who has left the Diocese temporarily, was accepted and the Auxiliary elected Mrs. E. G. Peoples as her successor. Other new officers elected were:

The Auxiliary looks forward to a year of continued growth in the Master's service.

REPORT OF ST. AGNES HOSPITAL

Dear Bishop Penick:

On behalf of The Board of Managers, I have the honor of submitting herewith The Report of St. Agnes Hospital for the year of 1942 together with the audited accounts for the year and a copy of the report made to the Duke Foundation.

Board of Managers

The Board of Managers, which had been appointed in the Fall of 1941, took over the responsibility of the management and finances of the hospital on January 1, 1942. On June 1, the hospital was incorporated under the laws of North Carolina, thereby completing the separation from St. Augustine's College.

During the year there has been one change in the membership of the Board: Mr. S. Linton Smith resigning on entering service with the Navy. Governor J. C. B. Ehringhaus was appointed to the Board in his place and Mr. A. T. White was elected as secretary.

Administration

After a year's service Miss R. E. Feider resigned as administrator. Under her administration the reorganization took place. She very ably supervised the reorganization and planned for the

renovation of the hospital. Dr. A. W. Tucker was appointed administrator in July.

Nursing

During the year 11 nurses were graduated from the Nurses Training School. A new class of 44 probationers was admitted and of these 24 have been retained. Mrs. Rosa Mae Godley has been Superintendent of the School and Miss Florence Hargett Directress of the Nursing Service in the hospital.

Building and Equipment

When the Board of Managers took over the management of the hospital urgent problem they found was the renovation and re-equipment of the hospital. Owing to the lack of funds, this has to be carried out as finances have become available. A fund of \$7,500.00 was given by Wake County for renovation and equipment. With this fund and with funds from operating account the following program was carried out:

At present we believe we will have funds for the above, and if further funds are available more will be done.

Clinical Work

During the year there were 1,914 patients discharged, of which 323 were newborn; 3,263 visits to the out-patient department. There were 136 deaths of which 17 were stillborn and 14 newborn. There were 4,921 laboratory examinations and 297 X-ray examinations. There were 597 operative procedures, of which 293 were major. For more detail see the Report of the Duke Foundation.

Finances

The accompanying audited accounts and Report to the Duke Foundation will fully cover the operating account and the Balance Sheet. We would call attention to the difference between the two, in that in the hospital accounts money is reported in the year received whereas in the Duke Foundation Report their grant is reported in the year on which the grant is based (the year before it was received).

The year ended with an excess of expenditure over income of \$2,944.50. This is partly explained by the capital expenditure from operating accounts; but mostly to the increase in cost of food and supplies. This we will have to expect to continue, and makes necessary the finding of new sources of income. Increasing the fees probably would not help to a great extent as a very large proportion of the patients have difficulty in meeting the present fees.

What the hospital really needs is a more liberal support by the individuals of the community. Saint Agnes is the only public hospital in Wake County for Negroes and the contributions from individuals and church organizations only amounted to \$530.00 during the year and a fair amount of this was not local. During 1943 a campaign for raising funds for the hospital is planned and it is hoped that it will meet a most generous support.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINING CHAPLAINS

In accordance with Canon VI, section 5, the Board of Examining Chaplains of the Diocese of North Carolina submits the following report:—

On November 25, 1942, at Christ Church Parish House, Raleigh, Mr. Ray Holder was examined under Canon 4, I. Examining Chaplains present were Messrs. Wright, Brown, Goold, and Lawrence.

Mr. Holder passed a satisfactory examination, and the report was sent promptly to the Bishop.

On the same day, at a brief meeting of the Board of Examining Chaplains, the resignation of the Rev. R. B. Owens as chairman was accepted, and the Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence was chosen to succeed him.

At the request of the Bishop, the Board is advising James R. Fortune, Carl F. Herman, Matthew Aurelius Jones, candidates for Holy Orders as to their studies.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF KANUGA

May 12, 1943

On Sunday, July 19, 1942, the completed and paid for Chapel of the Transfiguration at Kanuga Lake was dedicated "in Loving memory of Kirkman George Finley, D.D., First President of Kanuga Conference." The offering on that occasion, which was also a special memorial to Bishop Finley, was given to the Negro Summer Conference, at St. Barnabas Mission, Jenkinville, S. C. The following day, July 20, the Board of Managers held their regular summer meeting at Kanuga and four out of the five members representing this Diocese, were present, viz.: Rev. James M. Dick, Mrs. Urban T. Holmes, Miss Rhetta Aughtry, and John S. Holmes. The financial situation was discussed and several resolutions were adopted. One of these resolutions provided for the appointment by the President of the Board, Bishop Gribbin, of a committee of three laymen to be known as the Finance and Property Committee "whose duties shall be to supervise the finances, and to execute plans for the maintenance and improvement of the property. The members of this committee shall not necessarily be of the Trustees or of the Board of Managers, but will serve as a committee of the Board and report to the Board." This committee was appointed as follows: Messrs. F. D. McLean, Auditor of Kanuga, Ernest Patton and William L. Mauney, and all three members attended the winter meeting of the Board in Columbia, S. C., last February. Another resolution provided for the establishment of a Kanuga Association of interested friends and churches whose members will make annual contributions for the improvement of the property. A committee of five men and women was appointed to carry out this recommendation. Some definite results have already been obtained.

It is much to be regretted that none of the five members of the Board from this Diocese attended the regular meeting at Trinity Parish House, Columbia, S. C., February 3, 1943; in fact, less than half the Board was present. It was on this occasion that Rev. A. Rufus Morgan, who has been identified with Kanuga since its inception, both as business manager and as superintendent, announced his intention to resign. At the personal request of Bishop Gribbin, who realized the difficulty of replacing him, he has very kindly consented to remain in charge until July 1. Mr. Morgan will be sadly missed by all "Alumni" of Kanuga; his ever ready help and advice, his cheerfulness and untiring energy, his enthusiasm and love for Kanuga and its traditions have endeared him to the thousands who have drawn faith and inspiration from the place and its conferences.

Your Trustee last visited Kanuga on April 19, just following the leaving of Farm Manager Frease and the installation of J. C. Heffner, who has for many years been connected with the manage-

ment of the property. Plans seem to be completed for holding all conferences and camps this summer as usual with some small necessary increase in conference fees.

ANNUAL REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF SAINT MARY'S SCHOOL, INC.,
OF RALEIGH, NORTH CAROLINA

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Incorporation, the President of the Board of Trustees of Saint Mary's School and Junior College presents herewith the report for the academic year 1942-43.

Since the Diocesan Convention of 1942 the following meetings of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee have been officially held:—

Annual meeting of the Board of Trustees on June 3, 1942, three Bishops, six Rectors and four Laymen in attendance. This gratifying attendance indicated approval of an annual meeting date following the confusion of Commencement week, allowing time for an uninterrupted consideration of the important school matters presented.

Meetings of the Executive Committee, quorums present, on July 9th, October 6th, 1942 and March 31st, 1943.

Among matters of importance considered in the above meetings are the following:—

1. New members welcomed to the Board of Trustees.
 - (A) Mrs. J. Cheshire Webb:—Diocese of North Carolina
 - (B) Mr. Stephen E. Burroughs:—Diocese of North Carolina
 - (C) Rev. G. Mark Jenkins:—Diocese of Western North Carolina
2. Mrs. J. Cheshire Webb was elected a member of the Executive Committee.
3. The Rev. Henry F. Kloman retired as Chaplain, June 30, 1942, with the close of the fiscal year.
4. Mrs. Ernest Cruikshank, President of Saint Mary's School, completes her 10th year service and is voted the commendation and appreciation of the Board for her achievements of the past decade.
5. Consideration and acceptance of reports of school executives and C.P.A. Auditor.
6. Election of the Rev. I. Harding Hughes as Chaplain of Saint Mary's School for the Fiscal Year.
7. Acceptance of the resignations from the Executive Committee of the Rev. I. Harding Hughes, who has become Chaplain of

Saint Mary's School and of the Rev. W. Tate Young, who has entered the Government Service as Chaplain.

8. Acceptance of bequest of Nannie Creecy Cahoon of Elizabeth City, North Carolina—interest in certain real estate to revert to Saint Mary's School, Inc.
9. The death of the Rev. Henry F. Kloman, August 29th, 1942.
10. Acceptance of an Annuity Plan for Faculty and Officers through Trust Agreement with the New England Mutual Life Insurance Company which became effective December 1st, 1942 with twenty-two members participating.
11. Approval of Faculty and Officers contracts for the 1943-44 session.
12. Consideration of Government Regulations as effecting school policies under war conditions.
13. Retirement of A. W. Tucker after 22 years' service as Business Manager of Saint Mary's School to become effective at the end of the fiscal year June 30th, 1943.

The 1942-43 session has been most satisfactory with a capacity enrollment of resident students:—232 registrations accepted and in addition 55 Day and Special Students. Total 287.

The Resident Students come from sixteen States. From North Carolina 179; Virginia 43; South Carolina 12; Tennessee 10; Alabama and New York 7 each; Florida 5; District of Columbia and New Jersey 4 each; Kentucky, Pennsylvania, Georgia and West Virginia two each; Arkansas, Massachusetts and Connecticut one each.

The Religious affiliations given by 232 Resident Students are:—Episcopalian 118; Methodist 51; Presbyterian 35; Baptist 17; and 5 from two other denominations while 6 are not members of the church.

church. During the present session 4 Resident Students have been baptized and 8 confirmed.

The affiliations given by 46 Day Students are: Episcopal 22; Methodist 9; Baptist and Presbyterian 4 each; 5 from three other denominations, while 2 are not members of the church.

As the report is written the applications of 184 Resident Students have been accepted for the 1943-44 session, of whom 87 are coming to Saint Mary's for the first time and 97 are returning students. A capacity registration for our 1943-44 session which opens in mid-September is assured.

War conditions have necessitated many changes during the present session but Saint Mary's has offered whole hearted co-operation. Since last October our students have taken military drill under R.O.T.C. officers from State College, supervised by U. S. Army Officers. The courses have been expanded to meet Government regulations in the Commercial, Home Economics and Art De-

partments. The Red Cross work has been featured, including First Aid and Life Saving Training. Regulations regarding:—rationing of food; wages; blackouts; collection of Victory Tax have been strictly enforced. During the recent "Second War Loan" drive, Faculty, Officers and Students purchased \$13,245.00 in Bonds and Stamps and generous subscriptions have been made by the students to the Red Cross, USO, Christmas Over-Sea Packages and other war activities.

A condensed, financial statement of Assets and Liabilities of Trustees Funds from the Auditor's report for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1942, is attached.

The Trustees hereby record their grateful appreciation to all the executive officers of the School for the faithfulness and efficiency with which they have discharged their several duties and responsibilities. We also express our regret over the termination of Mr. A. W. Tucker's connection with the School as the exceedingly competent Business Manager and loyal friend of St. Mary's.

THE ATTENDANCE for the season was the largest ever had at Vade Mecum. Including the leaders and staff 923 persons were present during the course of the summer. They came from 75 different towns in North Carolina, and from five additional states: Virginia, Tennessee, South Carolina, New York and District of Columbia; and from two foreign countries: Austria and Puerto Rico.

THE LEADERSHIP of the Camps and Conferences, on the whole, was excellent, in spite of the fact that many prospective leaders were called into service, for Uncle Sam. The directors were fine. In some instances they were supported by a first-rate staff of counselors, in others the director had a burdensome responsibility in leading a staff of inexperienced and under-aged counselors. All in all the 1942 season brought before the Youth of the Diocese many of the best leaders of the Church, and gave the boys and girls fine, wholesome examples of Christian leadership sharing with them their knowledge and love of the Father and the Creator of all Nature, revealed in Jesus Christ.

A WAR TIME EMPHASIS was evident in all of the camp programs. The necessity for a "Christian front" was evident in all class discussions, and was a part of the theme and organization of some of the camps. The Senior Boys camp had groups named the "Commandos" and the "Mad Russians," etc. The Senior Girls groups were named "Flat tires," "Empty tanks," "Rubber scraps," etc. Camp Tise carried on an active campaign to gather up scrap metal—two full truck-loads. In addition to the regular courses, instruction was given in Red Cross Life-Saving with 18 boys and girls receiving em-

blems, and instruction in First Aid, out-door camping, and crafts also had prominent places on the program.

THE FARM supplied in 1942 for the first time Grade A milk from the dairy, and produced more than half of the total milk supply. The garden produced some of the vegetables used in the dining hall. In 1943 the farm will supply poultry in addition.

SCHOLARSHIPS contributed in 1942 made it possible for 120 boys and girls (including Camp Tise) to attend the camps and conferences. There are three Scholarship Funds which have become annual established sources of income. They are the Kuker Fund, the Baker Fund and the Laymen's League Camp Tise Fund. In addition to the funds contributed many Churches have established scholarship funds of their own to send boys and girls from their own parishes, to Vade Mecum.

REPORT OF THE MISSION TO THE DEAF

Your Layreader to the Deaf Congregations of the Diocese wishes to submit his report of his work from January 1 to May 9, 1943, inclusive:

He has conducted 28 services with the attendance of approximately 800 persons. He has preached once out of the Diocese with an attendance of 65 people for this service, and presented a paper to the North Carolina Sunday school for the Deaf Convention attended by about 125 persons.

He has assisted by interpreting at 2 funerals, 2 Baptisms, 6 Celebrations of the Holy Communion, and has presented 2 candidates for Confirmation.

As an example of the appreciation the Deaf have for the services being made available through your mission to the Deaf,

they are attending services even traveling often as far as 50 miles by bus due to the transportation difficulties today. May I express to you the gratitude of the Deaf for your continued interest and support.

I wish to give thanks to the Bishop, and the Clergy of this Diocese for the help they have so graciously given me in this work.

REPORT OF THE ARMY AND NAVY COMMISSION

We the members of the Army and Navy Commission of the Diocese of North Carolina beg leave to report as follows:

This commission appointed originally as the Committee on Military Camps within the border of the diocese of N. C., has been continued as a clearing house on matters pertaining to the Church and the men in service. It is a connecting link between this diocese and our National Army and Navy Commission, 1 Joy St., Boston, Mass. It seeks to study opportunities, and recommend action when needed. It is open to suggestion from all sides.

Within the borders of our diocese are five Military Training Camps. In order of their establishment, they are: Morris Field, near Charlotte; Camp Sutton, at Monroe; Camp Butner, near Durham. Camp Mackall at Hoffman; and a Training Depot at Greensboro. In these camps are many thousands of young men, who in some cases are without spiritual oversight of any kind, and if it does happen that they have Chaplains, it is usually the case that they do not have the ministrations of the sacraments of their own Church.

Aware of this situation, and desirous of meeting the need and the opportunity presented by at least two camps within the diocese, this commission recommended the appointment of two civilian chaplains, one for Butner, and the other for Sutton. In July the services of Rev. Rufus J. Womble of St. Mark's, Roxboro, were secured for Camp Butner, and Rev. William Penn Price, of Asheboro, and Thomasville, for Camp Sutton, Monroe. These men were to receive supplementary salary allowance, and an expense account, as in the case of Mr. Womble, and salary in full with an expense account as in the case of Mr. Price. The reports of these two men have been received.

The Commission would recommend the continuance of the work of Rev. Rufus J. Womble, and the financial help of those ministers of Churches near the camps, conducting work with the soldiers of the nearby camps. This aid may be obtained through the Bishop from the Army and Navy Commission. We do not recommend the

appointment of a successor to Rev. Wm. P. Price, who has resigned from the work as civilian chaplain at Camp Sutton, and is now a regularly commissioned chaplain in the U. S. Army. The situation at Camp Sutton has sufficiently changed so as to make the expense of a full time civilian chaplain unwarranted. (The camp is not as large as formerly, and it is now being supplied with Army chaplains.)

The Commission recommends a generous support of the National Army and Navy Commission, 1 Joy St., Boston, as it is our own principal source of support for the work done for the entertainment of the soldiers at Churches near our Camps. For instance, St. Philip's, Durham, is at this time receiving a subsidy of \$50 per month from this source. Other Churches receive help. This Commission issues the Church Crosses, the A. & N. Prayer Book, and Hymnals, and aids the Chaplains of our Church in their work.

We would recommend the sending of the names of the men going into service, either directly to the Post Chaplain of the camp to which they go, or else to the Chairman of the Diocesan Army and Navy Commission, who will forward notice to the chaplain at the camps, or to the National Army and Navy Commission.

We recommend a wholehearted support of the Red Cross, in its work. The women of the Church can be especially helpful in its program of work with the men in the hospitals, etc.

We recommend a wholehearted support of the U.S.O. This organization backed by our Government, establishes service men's clubs in towns and cities near our Camps, and does a very commendable work, through its trained personnel. The men in service are made to feel that these places are their own headquarters when they are in town.

This commission commends the members of our Church for its work in offering hospitality to the soldiers who attend service. These men away from their own homes appreciate very deeply the invitations to private homes.

We close by again saying that this commission is anxious to serve as a clearing house for ideas that may help the work of the Church among the men in the camps within the borders of our Diocese. We want suggestions, and we want advice.

COLLEGE WORK

During the year 1942, in spite of several difficulties, the work in our Colleges was carried on much as usual. However, there was much restlessness. With the calling up of the Army and Navy reserves and the drafting of the younger men, probably not more than half of the men students returned to College in January, 1943. Since then, special Army and Navy schools have been established at Duke, Carolina, and State, and now the Navy V-12 Program has begun. The great majority of students are now in uniform and are under Army or Navy discipline. Their free time is very much limited. At Duke and Carolina, Mr. Parsley and Mr. Gribbin have tried to keep in touch with all Episcopal students, with varying success. Attendance at Church Services has been good.

Though there has not been as much restlessness among the Co-Eds, still they, of course, are affected by the times. Miss Fletcher reports a full program successfully carried out at the Woman's College, and the girls have taken an important part at Duke and Carolina.

At Chapel Hill, we have not been able to do much with the Pre-flight School. They have their own Chaplain and their own Church service, but they are allowed to come to the Communion Service in the Church every other month and a hundred or more cadets have taken each time the opportunity of coming.
