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Rules of Order for the Government of North Carolina Conference.

1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's annual report.

2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of

the Conference shall be elected by ballot.

3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and called the Conference to order.

4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of

the Scripture and prayer, under the direction of the President.

5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.

6 It shall be the duty of the chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflections

or irrelevant debate.

7. The chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.

8. All the committees shall be appointed by the chair, unless other-

wise ordered by the Conference.

- 9 The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
- 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.
 11. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the chair.

12. No member shall be permitted to speak more than once on any

question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.

13. No person shall pass between the chair and a member while speaking, nor interrupt the speaker except by permission to explain.

14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud

to disturb the Conference.

15. Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.

16. Members are required to vote in all cases, except excused there-

from by the Conference.

- 17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.
- 18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.

19. All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on

the main question.

20. All questions of order arising after the previous question has

been called for shall be decided without debate.

21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.

22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.

23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be called

up again during the session.

25. No member shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.

26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.

27. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.

PROCEEDINGS.

The seventy-fifth session of the North Carolina Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, met in Pinnacle Church, November 21, 1900, and was called to order by the President, W. F. Kennett, at 10 o'clock.

The President conducted devotional exercises as follows: Song, "And are we yet alive;" prayer by G. E. Hunt; Scripture lesson, 1 Thess. 1; song, "Jesus, united by Thy grace;" prayer

ident's report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the North Carolina Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, Pinnacle, N. C., Nov. 21, 1900:

Dear Brethren: By the manifold mercies of God we are permitted

to come together again in annual session.

This time we are all here. Not one of our number has been called away during the year. Nor has serious sickness hindered the work to any considerable extent. For these and all other blessings we should be profoundly grateful to God, and we should praise him "for his goodness and for his wonderful works to the children of men."

Soon after the rise of last Conference Rev. W. O. Davis was appointed to the pastorate of Albemarle circuit, which had been left unsupplied. The last of April Rev. H. J. Hartsell was appointed associate pastor of Grace Church, Greensboro, to serve during the school vacation in order that the pastor might be permitted to take a much need-

In May Rev. H. L. Powell was ordained an elder in accordance with a Conference resolution. Revs. J. D. Williams and P. C. Battle as-

sisted in the ordination service.

Very early in the year I entered upon the unreasonable task of trying to visit all the churches in the Conference. It was my purpose to visit during the year every pastoral charge, and yet find time to attend the General Conference in May. This led to my over-working in the early spring, and to a consequent inability to do much during the unusually hot summer. I have therefore not been able to visit all the fields—indeed, have been forced to miss quite a number. In most instances where I have failed the appointments have been filled by the

On the majority of fields the President's assessment has been raised in part, and on some of them the full amount has been paid, notwith-

standing my failure to reach them.

This, to my mind, indicates a healthy state of affairs and a loyalty to the church that is truly refreshing—and I think it not amiss to thus publicly acknowledge the faithfulness of pastors and people, and to

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give expression to my sincere appreciation of their loyalty. I am sure no one can regret my inability to reach all the fields more than I do.

Eight years ago the President of the Conference, in his annual report, says, in regard to the President traveling the entire district: "The visiting of the work under the old plan is a task which can not be accomplished in the future, the work having outgrown the capac-This session should break the long standing precedent and make the executive of the N. C. Conference what his title indi-At present he is simply a preacher at large and the executive work goes under." If this were true eight years ago, it is certainly a larger truth at this time, as the Conference has grown very considerably since then, and I would recommend the appointment of a strong and carefully selected committee, who shall devise, if possible, some plan by which the President's work may be lessened and at the same time his usefulness increased.

This committee should report before the election of president. I do not know the spiritual condition of the church. Some of the pastors have reported during the last quarter of the year that their churches were in good spiritual condition, while a few have reported their work not in very good condition; quite a number have failed to make any report at all.

As it is the duty of the President to see that pastors enter upon and continue in the faithful discharge of their pastoral duties, and as the President ought to be kept posted as to the general condition of the work, I am of the opinion that this Conference should require pastors to regard their Disciplinary duty of reporting quarterly to the Presi-

dent.

While I do not know the general condition of the church, I am quite sure that we need a genuine revival of old time religion throughout our bounds.

Too many of our churches are characterized by cold formality; we need a fresh baptism of the Holy Ghost and of power from above. And yet there have been many gracious revivals during the year, and I trust the reports will show a very good increase in our membership. Perhaps an unusual amount of improvement has been made in

church property during the year.

On Haw River circuit one new church has been completed and three others have been repaired and much improved. On Richland circuit two churches have about been completed, while sufficient subscriptions are in hand to re-build at Charlotte on this charge and work has

On Why Not circuit two good new churches are under way—one at Fair Grove, the other at Love Joy, and each is far enough advanced to

insure the completion of the undertaking.

At Ai on East Guilford circuit, a nice new church has been built

and dedicated.

The new church at Rural Hall, on Forsyth circuit, has been completed and dedicated, and steps have been taken which will result in

a new building at Hickory Grove on this charge.

A new church building is going up at Orange Chapel, Saxapahaw rouit. One at Haw River, Mt. Hermon circuit. One on Halifax circuit. One on Wadesboro circuit. The church at Gibsonville has circuit. been considerably improved. Mecklenburg circuit also reports improvements in church property.

The new church in Plymouth is not yet complete, but some work has been done during the year—and the debt on the church has been somewhat diminished; while in Edenton a nice lot has been secured

and paid for- the brick bought and paid for, and the lumber and shingles secured, at least in part. Altogether about \$800.00 have been

raised for this important church enterprise.

The splendid new church in Henderson is now about complete and will be occupied the first Sunday in December. I need not call attention to the improvements here at Pinnacle as the church and parsonage speak for themselves, and for the pastor and people. I think it probable that quite a number of other churches have been improved and some new buildings begun which have not been reported to me.

In addition to these is the new church well under way at Rocky Mount, but this will be more particularly noticed in the report of the

Board of Church Extension.

Good new parsonages have been built on Liberty and Mt. Hermon circuits, while Roanoke and Winston circuits have purchased homes

for their pastors.

I wish to call your attention to some special needs of our Conference. We need more men who are well equipped for the work-men who know, love and honor the Methodist Protestant church. I fear the Stationing Committee will find it difficult to supply the work at this time, and quite impossible to supply it satisfactorily. We can get plenty of men. I think not less than twenty men from other states and some from other churches have sought encouragement to apply for admission into our Conference, in the past two years. But in every instance where I have made inquiries, I have deemed it unwise to offer any encouragement to them to apply. Our experience teaches us that men who have grown up in our midst and who know our church, and know what to expect when they come into our ministry are most useful in our Conference. We should pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers as our needs require—and I believe it would be well for us, as pastors, to speak more frequently upon the subject of a Divine call to the ministry and to converse privately with young men, in our congregations, to whom we may have reason to believe God has given preaching talent. In this way our ranks can best be kept full.

Again we need, and must have, if we are to succeed as we should, better work in the pastorate by those of us who are already in the I fear we do not devote our time, our talents and our energy as fully to the work as we should. I believe the pastor should, when possible, live in the "midst of his flock," or on his field of labor, for while the preaching of the gospel is the first and greatest work of the minister, he must also be a pastor. There are funerals to conduct, marriages to attend, and the sick especially to be visited, while the

spiritual interests of all must be looked after.

These things the pastor who lives remote from his charge can not or The pastor, to hold his people and build them up, must of necessity know them, and to do this he must go into their homes. The pastor who sees his people only at church does not know either them or their needs, nor will he be likely to see them at church very long, for it is true that "a house-going preacher makes a church-going people."

Once more, in order to better pastoral work, we must have better pastoral support. It is unreasonable to expect a man to give his time, talent and energy to the work, especially if he has a family to care for, on a salary of \$250 or \$300. The salaries of our pastors should average at least \$400 a year. I believe a fair and righteous salary is more easily paid and will much more likely be paid, than will a small and niggardly one.

Now which of these last needs shall be supplied first; shall they not come together? Let the pastor assure his people that it is his desire to give himself fully to the work of the pastorate and to the upbuilding of the cause of Christ; and that he expects them to support him, and will they not do it? I believe they will to an extent that would surprise many of us; but if they are able and will not, they are unworthy of the services of a faithful man of God.

I would recommend that an entire evening during this Conference be set apart for the discussion of these two important questions—better pastoral work and better pastoral support. I believe we can well

afford to take time for such a service.

There are also a number of other needs which should receive careful attention. We need a much more extended circulation of our church literature. There should be a Methodist Protestant paper in every Methodist Protestant home, and it should be the aim of pastors and people to accomplish this very desirable end at as early a day as possible.

There should be some changes made in boundaries, but while it is difficult to develop large fields I think we should guard against forming pastoral charges that are too weak to support a pastor, as the pastor who must supplement his salary by doing other work can

not hope to be eminently successful as a pastor.

It is the opinion of many that the plan of stationing the preachers should be so changed as to leave the report subject to adoption by the Conference, and that the custom of submitting the report to the Committee of Appeals, before it is presented to the Conference, should be abandoned.

With these changes I know of no better plan by which the pastors can be stationed than the one which has been in use for the past three

years.

The General Conference sent down four overtures to be acted upon by the Annual Conferences. These overtures are to be found on the 136th page of the General Conference Journal. The first overture would make representation in the General Conference depend on the payment of at least twenty-five per cent. of the assessment made by the various Boards for general interests.

The second would strike out Section 3, of Article 8, of the Constitution and provide for the election of representatives to General Con-

ference, by the Annual Conferences.

The third would change the time of meeting of the General Confer-

ence to the third Wednesday in May.

The fourth would confine laymen to laymen in their selection of

representatives.

The General Conference replied to the resolution sent up by our last Annual Conference in the following language: "A resolution passed by the North Carolina Conference asking the General Conference to render a decision as to whether or not a lay member of the church, who has been tried by a local committee, and appealed from its decision to the Quarterly Conference, has a further right to appeal on a point of law, from the decision of the Quarterly Conference to the Annual Conference, was referred to your committee.

"After carefully reviewing the question, your committee is of the opinion that neither the Constitution nor Discipline makes provision

for such appeal."

This report of the Judiciary Committee was adopted by the General Conference.

And now, dear brethren, in concluding my report, I wish again to

try to express my deep regret at not being able to do all the work required by the action of Conference. I assure you my failure has caused me much grief, but if I have not done all that I could, I feel that I have at least been sincere and have thought I was doing my duty. I am grateful to God for the strength He has given, and that I have been permitted to do some work, and I wish to thank everyone of you for your many acts of kindness to me. You have all been kind, and many have been very thoughtful in their kindness. It is with a sense of great relief that I come to the close of the year, and I shall with sincere pleasure, welcome to the office of President my successor whom you are soon to choose.

May God's richest blessing rest upon us in Conference session, and may His Kingdom come and His Will be done on earth as it is in Heaven, and may our Conference be so faithful and so baptized with Power from on High that we may do our full part in the spread of

the glorious gospel of Christ.

Conference Stewards granted leave to retire from sessions at pleasure.

Ordered that any pastor whose financial report is not in the hands of the Conference Stewards by 11 o'clock to-morrow be reprimanded.

Directed that pastors should include themselves in reporting number of preachers and ministers on their respective charges, even if they live elsewhere.

Selection of place for meeting of next Conference taken up. Henderson was placed in nomination. On motion, Henderson

was selected by unanimous rising vote.

Motion to meet next year on Thursday before the fourth Sunday in November, an amendment having been withdrawn, carried.

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM.

To the Annual Conference of the North Carolina District, Methodist Protestant Church:

We, your Committee on Program, appointed by motion at the last session (see minutes middle of Page 20) beg leave to say that having examined the Discipline, Rules of Order, and Order of Business, and some copies of our recent Minutes, we believe that, if we will observe the Rules, Resolutions, and laws already in force, together with ordinary business maxims, we have program sufficient.

Report No. 2.

COMMITTEE ON PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

1. "I would recommend the appointment of a strong and carefully selected committee, which shall devise, if possible, some plan by which the President's work may be lessened and at the same time his usefulness increased." Your Committee approves and recommends that this Committee be appointed.

2. Regarding the reporting of the pastors quarterly to the Presi-

dent, we recommend that in the future the passage of the pastor's official character depend on his having made such report, unless pre-

vented by some good reason acceptable to the Conference.

3. Referring to the need for men pointed out, we recommend that the month of May be set apart for pastors on circuits and the first Sunday in May for those serving stations, to preach on "A Call to the Ministry," and call upon the people to pray the Lord of the Harvest to send forth laborers into the harvest; that if practicable the collection for Ministerial Education be taken at this time; and that the pastors seek to induce persons of means to assist worthy young men in preparing for the ministry.

4. We favor the recommendation that an evening be set apart during this Conference to discuss the twin subjects: "Better Pastoral Work and Better Pastoral Support," and recommend that the Committee on Program be instructed to appoint the time and arrange for such discussion. We recommend that other suggestions concerning better pastoral work and larger pastoral salaries be referred respect-

ively to the Committees on Pastoral Work and Finance.

5. We recommend that the suggestion concerning church papers be referred to the Committee on Literature; and that concerning Boundaries be referred to the Committee on Boundaries.

6. Referring to the suggestion concerning the stationing of ministers

and preachers, we recommend that the following be the plan:

(a) That the Conference shall vote by orders; the ministers shall elect by ballot one man; the laymen shall elect by ballot one man. The two men thus elected shall constitute the Stationing Committee.

(b) That it shall be the duty of said committee, so far as practicable, to station the effective preachers and ministers of the Coference; and to supply, so far as practicable, all the charges of the District; also to name chairmen of sub-districts and sub-district superintendents of Christian Endeavor.

(c) That in the event the Stationing Committee cannot agree in the appointment of any preacher or minister, or in the supply of any charge, they shall agree upon a disinterested person to constitute a third member of said committee, to act with themselves while stationing said preacher or minister or supplying the said charge concerning which the two could not agree.

(d) That the Conference, voting in a body, shall elect by ballot, three ministers and three laymen, who shall constitute the Committee

on Appeals.

(e) That in case any contest shall be brought before the Committee on Appeals, which personally affects either minister or the charge represented by either laymen of the committee, that said minister or layman, thus personally interested, shall be excused from service on the committee during the hearing of said contest.

(f) That when the report of the Stationing Committee is submitted, it shall be before the Conference for consideration—to be adopted, amended, referred, recommitted, or disposed of in any way whatso-

ever a report of any other committee may be disposed of.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Since all Protestant denominations declare the Sunday School a department of the church, where the Holy Scriptures are taught for the salvation of souls, and for the building up of souls in Christ, every church member should be a member of the school and should strive to bring the children and all unsaved persons within its borders.

tablish branch or mission Sunday schools in every community.
3. Our own Sunday school literature should be provided in such

3. Our own Sunday school literature should be provided in such quantities for each school that persons not able to attend the school proper, may, nevertheless, be supplied with these helps to Bible Study and be counted as members in the Home Department.

4. Believing that the incompetency of teachers is one of the great barriers to the progress of this department of the church, we recom-

mend the following course of study for them:

a) Holy Bible.

(b) Revised Normal Lessons by Dr. Jesse L. Hurlbut.
 (c) Teaching and Teachers, by H. Clay Trumbull.

(d) Sunday School Success, by Amos R. Wells,
 (e) Practical Primary Plans, by Israel P. Black.

f) Dr. Scott's Catechism.

Note-- These books can be procured at either of the publishing houses

—Pittsburg or Baltimore.

5. We urge that more interest be given to gospel singing in our schools: that music suited to the institution be used, that the songs be repeated again and again; that the least and the simplest member of the schools may get it.

6. We recommend that Denominational Sunday School Associations be organized in each Circuit, Mission and Station, and annual meetings be held in connection with the Fourth Quarterly Conference.

7. That it shall be the duty of pastors to call the attention of Sun-

2. Next in importance to preaching the Word is that of Pastoral Work. No preacher, it matters not how much natural talent, or mental qualifications he may have, can succeed, as he ought, unless he visits his flock. We don't mean run from house to house, and discuss every subject that might be proposed, without having anything definitely in view, but considering his high calling, the needs of his members, and the best way to do them the most spiritual good. comes an opportunity to speak to them personally, about their spiritual condition, and if there are any difficulties in the way of their spiritual progress the pastor is informed, his advice obtained, and in most cases, great good is accomplished. He should not only visit those who are in good circumstances, but look after the poor and unfortunate as well. He especially should visit the sick, and comfort the bereaved, for, in the same proportion to the interest he manifests in his people, will his congregation be increased or diminished, and consequently his usefulness determined.

MISSIONS.

This has been an eventful year in the history of modern missions. The persecutions of foreign and native Christians in the Chinese Empire have been, perhaps, without a parallel, in modern times, unequaled, perhaps, since the wholesale persecution of Pagan Rome. But this should but stimulate the church to greater efforts in pushing the battle to the gates. The talk that comes from some quarters that we should retire from the field because of recent and present persecutions, is non-Christian to the last degree. The command to "go," does not mean to stop when persecution arises. When the ranks of an army are decimated by the enemy's fire, the State does not give up the contest, but orders more men to the front, and shall the church of the living God do less, in attempting the conquest of the world?

But we are glad to say that these fearful persecutions have not touched our foreign members and missionaries, as the greater part of our foreign work is in Japan. And the two missionaries in China, who have been sent out by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, have, so far, been exempt from the fearful persecutions raging in that land.

We are glad to be able to report the Board of Home Missions out of debt, and on a sound financial basis. And the Home Board asks for a greatly increased contribution the coming year from the North Carolina Conference, in the sum of \$1850.00. And this committee recommend that said amount be apportioned to the different charges.

We are pleased to note the presence of Miss Annie L. Forest, of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, who has been doing a noble work in the North Carolina District in behalf of the foreign work,

carried on by the society she represents.

ON LITERATURE.

Your Committee on Literature would report:

1. Those who use our Sunday School literature know its worth. Our Discipline provides that each Quarterly Conference shall require

that "our own" papers and lesson helps be used. Pages 67-8.

2. The Methodist Protestant and the Methodist Recorder are the official organs of our church. They are accountable to the church for their proficiency and for their income. Each member of this Conference is accountable to God for the disposal he makes of these, our own organs, not simply for the sake of the organs, nor because of our vows, but for the sake of the people we serve and who need light. We recommend that this Conference ask the publishers of these official organs for a definite understanding to the effect that the uniform price of the papers be \$1.50. We remind our members that the publishers offer a free subscription to every one who secures ten sub-We recommend that the subscription list of Our Church Record be raised to 1,600 paid subscriptions during the coming year. That we get a statement from each layman here as to the number of copies he is willing to place on his work. That each layman here be appointed a committee to have First Quarterly Conference to appoint a committee of one at each of the appointments to report items of interest to Our Church Record at stated times, and to look after the subscription list. This to be under the supervision and with the cooperation of the pastor. That the publisher be asked to remunerate such agent with a paid subscription as soon as said agent secures as many as ten new subscriptions. We would endorse Section 5 of the report of the Committee on Literature last year. That there be as often as practicable special educational issues of Our Church Record giving information concerning our institutions and different departments of work, such as Western Maryland College, Westminster Theological Seminary, Kansas City University, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Church Extension, and the like.

3. We recommend that in the table of statistics next year separate columns be provided for the Methodist Protestant, the Methodist Recorder

and Our Church Record.

4. We heartily recommend *The Woman's Missionary Record*, the official organ of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Protestant Church. The address of the *Record* is Tennyson Heights, Kansas City, Kansas. It is a useful magazine, not only for the Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies of our district, but for educating all our people on Foreign Missions.

5. We would call attention to the rule in our Discipline that the Stewards furnish the pastor of each charge with copies of the Discipline to present one to each new member received into the church.

BY THE FACULTY.

Report No. 26.

FINANCE.

1. We believe that pastors should teach the people to honor God with their substance; that contributing of one's means is as certainly a part of worship as is praying; that contributing is both a duty and a privilege; that people should contribute first in importance for their own development, and second, to supply the needs of the church

in extending the kingdom.

2. We believe that a preacher's ability as a financier is indicated, not so much by his ability to live on a small salary, as by his ability to raise the Conference assessments. We believe, also, that a preacher's standing in the Conference should be determined in part by his ability raise the Conference assessments, and that the passage of his official character should depend upon his having made a faithful ef-

fort to raise these collections.

3. We recommend that the First Quartely Conference on circuits apportion among the churches the amounts assessed by this Conference for the various interests. That the necessary information to do this may be in hand, we recommend that the assessments made by this Conference be published at the earliest possible date in Our Church Record. We further recommend the individual assessment plan so far as practicable. We recommend no specific methods for collecting the assessments, but urge that pastors be required to give the matter their personal attention—putting collectors in the field; using, if it seems wise, circle cards, barrels, envelopes, pledge cards, or such other legitimate devices as may be at hand or as they may devise; but we do urge that pastors make it their business to collect these assessments and faithfully endeavor to do so.

4. We recommend the following assessments to be apportioned among the charges on the basis of the President's salary (except for

Election Law of the North Carolina Conference.

The Second Quarterly Conference of each pastoral charge shall nominate double the number of laymen to which the field of labor may be entitled, as delegates to the Annual Conference; the pastor shall announce from each pulpit the names of the nominees, and appoint a day, which shall be that on which his appointment shall fall at each church, if practicable, for taking the vote by ballot, for the number to which the charge may be entitled; the ballots cast by members over twenty-one years of age, to be received by class leaders and stewards, under the supervision of the pastor, and by them to be counted, and the count to be forwarded to the Third Quarterly Conference, to be compared by that body; the brother or brethren receiving the plurilly of votes shall be declared duly elected, and a certificate shall be given accordingly, and the pastor immediately after Third Quarterly Conference, shall certify to the Secretary of the Annual Conference the representative elected.



Rules of Order for the Government of North Carolina Conference.

1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's annual report.

2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of

the Conference shall be elected by ballot.

3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.

4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of the

Scripture and prayer, under the direction of the President.

- 5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.
- 6. It shall be the duty of the chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflections or irrel-

evant debate.

- 7. The chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.
 - 8. All the committees shall be appointed by the chair, unless other-

wise ordered by the Conference.

- 9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
 - 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.
- 11. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the chair.

12. No member shall be permitted to speak more than once on any

question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.

13. No person shall pass between the chair and a member while speaking, nor interrupt the speaker except by permission to explain.

14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud to

14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently foul to disturb the Conference.

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15. Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.

16. Members are required to vote in all cases, except excused therefrom by the Conference.

17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be

seconded.

18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay

on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.

19. All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on

the main question.

20. All questions of order arising after the previous question has been

called for shall be decided without debate.

21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.

22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.

23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be called up

again during the session.

25. No member shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.

26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.
27. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper com-

mittee.

The seventy-sixth session of the North Carolina Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, met in Henderson Church, November 20, 1901, and was called to order by the President at 9:45 a. m.

The President read his annual report, which was referred to the proper committee.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the North Carolina Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, Henderson, N. C., Nov. 21, 1901:

DEAR BRETHREN: Another mile stone of life has been passed, and another year with its successes and its failures is in the eternal past, and we are again assembled in annual session to give account of it and to plan for the future.

Through the mercy of the Lord of the vineyard not one of our number

has this year been called to his final account.

Immediately after Conference, Bro. Geo. W. Holmes was tendered the pastorate of Roanoke circuit which, after due consideration, he accepted. Bro. R. L. Clinton was appointed to Catawba circuit in January and

Bro. J. H. Gilbreath, to La Grange in April.

In March, Bro. Plyler was released from Davidson circuit on account of ill health, and Bro. McDowell and Bro. Highfill were each asked to take charge of it, but both declined. In April, Bro. J. M. Kennett of Missouri, who was visiting here, offered to become its pastor and, as I saw nothing

better to do, he was appointed.

The last session of Conference referred Rev. I. I. York to the President Bros. W. L. Harris, J. R. Hutton, and T. M. Johnson were appointed Committee of Trial, and on February 27 we met, by request, at the house of Bro. York for trial. He was found guilty of that part of the charge relating to sinful tempers, and suspended from the ministry till the Conference see fit to restore him.

The witnesses on whom the prosecutor was depending to prove the

other part of the charge did not appear.

Your Executive does not think it would be wise to restore him till such

time as he shall prove by his conduct that he is penitent.
In the case of J. F. Austin against the publishers of the Mill News, which was pending at our last session, so bad a character was proved on said Austin it seemed that it would bring the church into reproach for him to be longer connected with it in an official capacity, and as he had not been to the work assigned him, the resignation of his appointment was demanded and received, and soon thereafter he surrendered his license to preach and withdrew from the Methodist Protestant Church.

In accordance with a resolution of Conference, Rev. W. R. Lowdermilk was, on February 20, ordained to the office of Elder. As I was at that time confined to the house with lagrippe, he was ordained by Rev. J. F. McCulloch, assisted by Revs. T. M. Johnson and W. L. Harris.

I have visited all the fields of labor in the district this year with the exception of Caldwell, Greensville, and Spring Church; and the two last named Bro. C. H. Whitaker visited for me.

I have also made two trips to South Carolina in the interest of our In three of the counties which I visited, I found a loyal though not large membership of excellent people. It is expected that two representatives will attend this Conference to have their work incorporated with ours.

At our last session the following was passed: "we recommend that the president be required to visit all the mission fields, fields occupied by unordained men, and all Sub-district Conferences (time for said Conferferences to be arranged with that in view), and all stations and circuits when and where his services as executive may be needed. demand was so strong that the executive undertook to visit all the fields, and came as near accomplishing it as before indicated, but in doing so had to neglect other work that should have been done.

Besides this I have visited five Sub-district Conferences and made the

two trips to South Carolina spoken of above.

In many places I have preached, made an address on Church Extension, and presented the claims of Our Church Record and other interests all at one service; and done this two and three times a day.

With a few exceptions the pastors have had the president to attempt to preach at all the appointments, though he might have had to preach three

times a day to do so.

I have heard of some churches expressing themselves as unwilling to pay the assessment on the president's salary if he did not visit them.

In the report of the president for 1896, I find the following: make the executive a tax collector to raise his own salary is a humiliation to the man and a grave reflection upon the church, and should you accomplish nothing at this session except to remedy this evil, the work done would be a full compensation for the assembling of Conference."

This is as true now as it was then. The president's getting his salary depends largely on his ability to visit all the churches in the district. large part of the people seem to think that he is paid just for the preaching that he does, and if he fails to visit their particular church they do

not owe him anything.

Another subject which we have had presented to us at almost every session for a number of years is that of pastoral support; and it is still unsolved. A great many people, it seems, try to see how little they can

pay and the church not go down altogether.

The assessments are as a rule entirely too small, and nearly all the pittance promised is frequently withheld till the close of the year, and per-The object of many fields, one would think, is haps not all paid then. not to find out how much they are able to pay the preacher, but how little the preacher can possibly live on. I for my part do not see how many of them live.

The people want a pastor who will live among them and devote his time to the work of the pastorate—and this is right—but then they want to pay him so little that he will be embarrassed all the time. I believe that, if the preachers of the N. C. Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church were not the most loyal and consecrated men in the world, nearly all the charges in the Conference would have been without preach-

ers before now.

The average assessment for pastor's salary last year was, according to the Minutes, in round numbers, \$325. Average received, \$279. Average deficit, \$46. Now, how a pastor can be expected to live on such a salary, not to speak of the books and periodicals which are so essential, is more than I can see. And when you take out the three or four best paying fields the average is much smaller.

To secure adequate pastoral support and prompt payment of the same

is one of the most important subjects that you can consider. I have some suggestions to make in regard to boundaries but these I will make to the Boundary Committee.

This session of the Conference should put the Discipline of the church in the Conference course of study and appoint an examiner for the same.

The Catechism and the Shorter Catechism of the Methodist Protestant Church should be in every Methodist Protestant home and Sunday-school. Many think that the present indifference to religion arises, at least in part, from relying on socalled evangelistic methods to the neglect of catechising.

And one having occasion to mingle much with the people will no doubt find out that there is much ignorance of the Bible, and the teaching of the catechism would do something towards remedying that state of

things.

The larger of these books contains matter on church government, and on this subject every Methodist Protestant should be instructed. Our people should be thoroughly drilled in the doctrine and polity of our church. Then we would have fewer losses by our people going to other churches. As long as our members think that some other church is as good as their own, and perhaps a little better, we will continue to lose in this way, and other people will not have the respect for us that our principles demand. The remedy is the intelligence of our members regarding our tenets.

The assessment for Church Extension for this year was laid at the insignificant sum of a little less than 17 cents per member, and from reports which I have received, I fear not all this little sum will be paid. And this assessment does not near represent the needs—or rather the opportunities of the work. Wherever the principles of our church are becoming known they are popular and there are numerous calls for our church in towns and communities where we have no church; and these calls should be heeded. Are they not God-given? Has not our Lord a work for us? And if we do not that work why should we expect to prosper?

This Conference should devise means for raising more money for this interest than we have ever raised. This is now perhaps the most important interest demanding the consideration of this body, and the most important collection that we have to raise. And though the full assessment be not raised this year, I do not think that the assessment should be lowered; but if it is not increased, we should insist that every cent for this cause be

raised.

While a pastor cannot do everything, and among some people he can do but little, much depends upon the pastor; and I believe that the Conference must cease to use ineffective men. Where year after year a pastor lets work go down on his hands—work after work—the Conference should refuse to give him work. And though the ability to raise the assessments is not the only measure of a pastor's success, it is one measure, and should be so regarded, and should affect a pastor's standing to that extent.

Illustrating what may be done by efficient work by pastors, I would call your attention to the following figures from one of our circuits.

In 1891, there were reported 339 members who paid pastor \$179.94, for all purposes, \$204.04, or an average of 60 cents per number. In 1895, 280 members paid pastor \$274.25, for all purposes, \$360.40 or \$1.28 per member. In 1898, 364 members paid pastor \$306.50; for all purposes, \$608.22, or \$1.67 per member. Last year, that same circuit with 393 members, paid pastor \$370.00; for all purposes, \$727.00, or \$1.85 per member; and has developed from almost the poorest field in the District to rank among the best. And who will say that the work of the pastors has not had much to do with this result.

This shows what may be done by the faithful and persistent and continued efforts of pastors, one after another. Why cannot this be repeated in other places?

The circulation of *Our Church Record* is not what it should be. It should be pushed by all our pastors, and by all the laymen who have the

interest of the church at heart.

Without reading there will be but little intelligence, and without intelligence, not much liberality; so that self-interest should prompt the pas-

tors to push the circulation of the church papers.

Our church above all others demands an intelligent membership, for it was founded in intelligence, and we will succeed only in proportion to the intelligence of our people. Therefore, Our Church Record should go into every home in the bounds of the Conference where there is a member of our church; and nothing short of this should satisfy us. The subscriptions to the Methodist Protestant (the best family and church paper)

should be largely increased within the bounds of our district.

That I might have a better and more comprehensive view of the work at the close of the year, I sent to every pastor a postal card asking for certain information. Some of the pastors gave the information asked for, some gave a part, and some did not answer at all. From the reports of those which answered, I find that on thirty-six fields eleven churches have been finished this year and there are eleven more in building. These fields have spent on churches this year \$6,403.00. At the time that these reports were made there had been on thirty-nine fields, 1388 conversions and 893 additions. These figures indicate a degree of prosperity, but not what had been hoped for.

I have tried to give you a glance at the needs and conditions of the work as I have seen it. In a report like this, much must necessarily be left out. While I have presented to you some of the shadows, there is much to encourage, much brightness which we think betokens the day. There is improvement nearly all along the line. Our people generally are hopeful. We are building many new churches in old locations, and the new are larger and better than the old. We are entering new fields and attracting more attention than perhaps ever before, at least since '28

and '30, and being invited to yet other openings.

So let us then thank God, take courage, and press on.

Thanking one and all for the uniform kindness with which I have been treated, and praying the blessing of the great Head of the church on you and your labors, I am,

Report No. 1. ON LITERATURE.

1. Literature is the legacy which great minds have left to mankind. In it we have in their best dress the most choice thoughts. By means of

it, without going to Endor, we call up the great spirits—the most learned philosophers and theologians, the wisest counsellors, the greatest divines—and make them our servants. Successful will be that minister who

calls to his service the world's great sages.

2. Before all others literature, in importance, stands the Bible. This book the minister must master. But let him not be a man of one book. History makes men wise; Poetry, witty; Fiction, imaginative; Mathematics, subtle; Metaphysics, deep; Moral Philosophy, grave; Theology, profound; Logic and Rhetoric, able to dispute and persuade. All these excellences a successful ministry must cultivate. The fathers of the M. P. Church, both cleric and laic, were literary men; and, if she continues to hold her high position among the sisterhood of churches, such also must be her sons.

3. For the development of our young people good literature is a most important factor. Inspire in them a love for good books, and they will want neither faithful friends, wholesome counsellors, cheerful companions, nor effectual comforters. Our young people must find amusement. The best and most wholesome amusement is good conversation. And for such conversation nothing so equips as the reading of good literature. Upon such reading depends, also, in every department of church

work the efficiency of our young people.

4. In our judgment, this Conference, through the Faculty, or some competent committee, should prepare a suitable course of reading for these young people. A special course should be prepared for the S. S.

and C. E. workers.

The Christian conscience is not yet aroused to the support of its denominational journals. And yet some people wonder that the Kingdom We have not yet realized to what extent the religadvances so slowly. ious journal is an instrument of redemption. For immediate righteousness and for Christian citizenship it is a mighty agent. But by such a limited circulation its influence is greatly restricted. Progress in every branch of church work is, and must be, retarded so long as our membership ignores the power of a well-sustained journalistic literature. Our Church Record, with its limited circulation, is doing, shows to some extent what, with an enlarged circulation, it would accomplish. what the "Record" is to this Conference, The Methodist Protestant and The Methodist Recorder are to the denomination. These journals do not exist for the sake of patronage, but for the good of the patron. That the greatest good may be accomplished, we must give to them the widest possible circulation; we must make the most of them for ourselves and our neighbors, for our local church and the denomination.

6. For lack of a better musical literature many of our churches have languished. The long felt need has now been met. We have, in both round and shaped notes, a hymnal as cheap as the cheapest and as good as the best. Let us hail its advent by introducing it for the "advent sea-

son" into every church in the N. C. Conference.

7. Among our most excellent S. S. periodicals there are none more attractive and more helpful than the *Morning Guide*. To our S. S. workers we earnestly commend it.

There is no question of more importance to the faithful pastor than the one of how to keep the young people saved. In most of our revivals we have young people converted and they need to be put right into some active work for Christ in order to not only keep them saved, but that they may develop and grow spiritually. Christian Endeavor has been found

to be especially helpful in this regard.

Many of our young people who are active in church work to-day can point back to the time when their first effort to do any public work was done in the C. E. Society. There the "wire edge" was knocked off and they found out they could do something for Jesus. Any one must find out that they can do something before they are ever very useful in this life. Therefore, believing that we have just as many "diamonds in the rough" as any church, according to our number, we urge our pastors wherever practicable, to organize C. E. COMMITTEE ON PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

Your Committee beg leave to make the following report:

The President in his report says that the executive is still made a "tax collector to raise his own salary." That the evil still exists is to be deplored. Your committee are of the opinion that the cause of this evil is that our people do not have a clear, correct conception of the executive as such. If our people could be induced to read our church papers more, this might go far toward bringing about the desired results. Your committee would recommend as a partial remedy that the pastors as soon after reaching their fields as practicable, make faithful efforts to collect the president's salary before he makes his visit.

We recommend that the item referring to Rev. I. I. York be referred to the Committee on Ministerial Moral Character.

We recommend that the unsolved problem of pastoral support be referred to a committee of three laymen, to be appointed by the Chair.

The President asks that some means be devised by which more money be raised for Church Extension. This item we recommend be referred to the Committee on Finance. Respectfully submitted,

Report No. 7.

The orthodox view of Baptism and the Lord's Supper, is: They are Ordinances of Christ. They are institutions of his own express appointment. At the close of the Passover he ordained the "Supper," administering to the "twelve" the "bread" and the "wine," saying,
"This do in remembrance of me." In the great commission He instituted the Christian Baptism, saying, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them," etc.
2. They are signs. They are visible emblems of internal spiritual

grace. The baptismal water points us to the corruption and depravity of our nature, which needs clensing, and to the fountain of grace by which we may be washed and purified. The bread and the wine direct our faith to the atonement of Christ—to his broken body and shed blood—exhibiting his redeeming mercy and love in suffering for sinners, that He

might bring them to God.

3. They are seals. As circumcision was the divinely-appointed seal of the covenant of redemption as given to Abraham, so "Baptism" and the "Supper" are seals under the gospel of the same covenant. By giving us these seals God confirms into us visibly the promise of His saving mercy. By receiving them, we enter upon the most solemn obligations of fidelity and obedience to God. Thus these sacraments, while we attach to them no superstitious idea of efficacy as a charm, or of directly imparting a spiritual benefit through a physical agency, yet are they a most influential means of grace. They tend to increase and confirm our faith, to quicken our spiritual powers, to encourage our hopes, and to renew and strengthen our obligations to love and to serve God. These ordinances should therefore be observed by all christians, and all ministers of the gospel should, in their public ministry, call attention to their importance.

Your committee is of the opinion that some of our pastors have in the past failed to give to these ordinances the attention which their importance demands. We have learned of one instance in which the Supper was administered in one of our strongest churches but once in two years. In another it was neglected until the members requested the pastor to administer it. Such neglect should not pass unnoticed—and we believe this Conference should find some way to insure greater faithfulness upon the part of pastors in regard to the ordinances. Very few infant baptisms are reported. They may also indicate a failure upon the part of the ministry to present in their public and private teaching the importance of consecrating our children to the Lord in the ordinance of Bap-

Report No. 19. COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Knowing the Sunday School to be an indispensable institution in all Protestant Churches, and knowing that the prosperity of the Methodist Protestant church depends largely upon the work done in our Sunday Schools, and feeling that more persistent, consecrated effort ought to be made to bring the children of all classes into our schools that they may be taught the great truths of the Gospel, and knowing that the Sunday School is one of our very best means of saving the young people, we recommend:

1. That all pastors see to it, so far as within their power, that there be a Sunday School in each of their churches, and that mission Sunday Schools be organized wherever practicable.

2. That the Methodist Protestant literature be used in all our Sun-

day Schools.

3. Knowing that a great responsibility rests upon the officers and teachers of each school, we recommend that the pastors urge upon the officers and teachers the necessity of reading such literature as will make them more intelligent workers for the Master. Especially should all our Sunday School workers be readers of *The Methodist Protestant* and *Our Church Record*.

4. Since there is a great lack of information upon the principles and doctrines among our own people, we recommend that our larger and Shorter Catechisms be taught in the Sunday Schools wherever practicable, and that at least a special effort be made to place these Catechisms, together with "Methodist Protestant Principles," in all our homes.

5. Feeling that there is a great and pressing need in our Conference

5. Feeling that there is a great and pressing need in our Conference for a better educated ministry and laity, we recommend that special efforts be made in all the Sunday Schools to awaken an interest in our colleges, and as Western Maryland College is nearer to us than any other of our colleges, that the first Sunday of July be set apart in our Conference District as College Day, that the subject of christian education be presented on that day in all our churches and Sunday Schools, and that collections be taken at the same time to be appropriated to the endowment fund of Western Maryland College.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

We fully recognize that the financial problem is the problem of the church, and requires the most careful consideration. We are persuaded that it is not the inability of the church which makes pastors' salaries small and general claims difficult to collect; but the failure, we believe, is partly in the unwillingness of the people to meet claims which they do not clearly understand, and is due largely to the distrustful manner in which the claims are presented.

The appointment of collectors, with catch-penny devices, without an enlightening explanation, may for the time catch the pennies, but is

entirely non-educative.

We do not present any specific plan for collecting general interest, but do recommend that pastors be required to give an instructive explanation of each interest before taking collections, for we are persuaded that an intelligent understanding of the importance of the general collections is necessary for liberal and systematic giving.

We recommend that a committee of three be appointed by the President who shall devise a better system regulating the making of financial reports and the paying over of moneys at Conference. That the plan agreed upon by the committee shall be published in Our Church Record not later than April, 1902, and shall be operative at the next session of

In view of the fact that we have no better basis than the pastor's salary for the apportionment of the President's salary and the claims of general interest, we recommend that the President's salary be an amount equal interest, we recommend that the Tresident's salary be an amount equation of 6½ per cent. of pastor's salary on each charge. That Foreign Missions be 10½ per cent.; Home Missions 10½ per cent.; Church Extension 15¼ per cent.; Ministerial Education 2 per cent.; Theological Seminary 2 per cent.; Superannuates 2 per cent.; Bible Society ¼ per cent. We recommend that the first Quarterly Conference of each charge appoint one Steward for each charge, whose duty it shall be to collect the President's salary quarterly and forward the same with postor's quarterly

Election Law of the North Carolina Conference.

The Second Quarterly Conference of each pastoral charge shall nominate double the number of laymen to which the field of labor may be entitled, as delegates to the Annual Conference; the pastor shall announce from each pulpit the names of the nominees, and appoint a day, which shall be that on which his appointments shall fall at each church, if practicable, for taking the vote by ballot, for the number to which the charge may be entitled; the ballots cast by members over twenty-one years of age, to be received by class leaders and stewards, under the supervision of the pastor, and by them to be counted, and the count to be forwarded to the Third Quarterly Conference, to be compared by that body; the brother or brethren receiving the plurality of votes shall be declared duly elected, and a certificate shall be given accordingly, and the pastor immediately after Third Quarterly Conference, shall certify to the Secretary of the Annual Conference the representative elected.







Rules of Order for the Government of North Carolina Conference.

1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's annual report.

2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.

The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.

4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of the

Scripture and prayer, under the direction of the President.

5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.

6. It shall be the duty of the chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflections or irrel-

evant debate.

The chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to 7. the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.

8. All the committees shall be appointed by the chair, unless other-

wise ordered by the Conference.

- The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
 - 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.
- No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the chair.

No member shall be permitted to speak more than once on any

question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.

No person shall pass between the chair and a member while speaking, nor interrupt the speaker except by permission to explain.

14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud to

disturb the Conference.

Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.

Members are required to vote in all cases, except excused there-

from by the Conference.

- No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.
- 18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.

All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on

the main question.

20.All questions of order arising after the previous question has been

called for shall be decided without debate.

The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.

All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.

No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

24.No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be called up

again during the session.

No person shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.

26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.

All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.

The seventy-seventh session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, met in Asheboro, N. C., November 20, 1902, at 10 a. m., President, Rev. C. L. Whitaker, in the chair, by whom devotional exercises were conducted. The names of the lay delegates were called. The following answered to their names: S. V. Floyd, W. W. Hunter. W. E. The President read his annual report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

DEAR BRETHREN:—After another year of toil we are assembled in annual session.

Since we last assembled, one of our number has passed from labor to his final account. A suitable obituary will, no doubt, be presented by the committee in due time.

The last session of this body detached West Lexington from Winston circuit and attached it to Uwharrie; but Uwharrie being left unsupplied, I asked Bro. Modlin to serve West Lexington, and he continued to do so through the year.

Later, Bro. Suits was assigned to the remainder of Uwharrie, and Bro.

Moore was assigned to Gastonia.

Bro. W. L. Harris was released from Winston station; Bro. T. F. McCulloch, from Oak Ridge; and Bro. J. D. Williams, from Liberty. Bro. Raper was assigned to Oak Ridge; Bro. T. F. McCulloch, to Orange; Bro. J. D. Williams, to Winston station; and Bro. E. G. Lowdermilk, to Liberty. Bro. Charlie J. Edwards was assigned to Ivy, and took charge in May. In the spring, Bro. Pickens, at my request, went to Concord to look after our interest there. He has organized a church and Sunday school, and bought and paid for a church lot. The last session of Conference suspended the passage of the character of Rev. George E. Hunt. That matter will be before you at this session, and I recommend that you fix an order of the day, and let it be as early as possible, for its consideration, and either pass his character or refer him for trial.

The church in Winston has been remodeled at considerable cost, this year. An attractive church has been built in South High Point, and with comparatively little help outside the town. New churches have also been built at Pleasant Hill and Hickory Ridge on Forsyth; at Union Ridge on Winston, and at Salem on Saxapahaw. The church in Edenton is inclosed with the exception of windows and doors. The flooring and ceiling has been donated, and is waiting to be put on. This church

should be completed as quickly as possible.

Several other churches are being built or renovated, and steps have been taken looking to building in Graham and Mebane at an early date. Parsonages have been built on Davidson and Gibsonville, and those on

Lincoln and Vance have been somewhat improved.

Every charge should have a comfortable and convenient parsonage, and it should be well located. Some seem to think that anything, anywhere, so it will keep the rain off the preacher's head, is good enough for a parsonage; and judged by conduct, some do not care if the preacher and his family have to stay out in the rain. A majority of the charges demand that the pastor live on the charge, and many have nowhere for him to live. One pastor had much difficulty, this year, in getting a house, and was much exposed on account of not being able to get a house at the proper time, while another pastor did not get a house at all, and consequently lived thirty miles from his charge. No charge should demand that the pastor live on it, unless there is a comfortable parsonage on it. This is one thing that our Conference is behind on.

In regard to boundaries, would recommend the following: Detach West Lexington from Uwharrie and attach to Winston circuit; detach Bethany from Haw River and attach to Flat Rock; detach Bethel from Flat Rock and attach to Oak Ridge; detach Forest Chapel from Oak Ridge and attach to Flat Rock; detach Bessemer from Broad River and attach to Gastonia; detach Oak Grove, Mt. Moriah and Mt. Pleasant from Cleveland and attach these, together with Casar, to Broad River; detach Pleasant Hill from Lincoln and attach to Cleveland. About Wadesboro, I hardly know what to say. It is so large it cannot be developed by one man, and yet it does not pay enough to support one man. The appointment at Pee Dee mills seems promising, and needs more time than it can get with the present arrangement.

In publishing the financial statistics, I would recommend that a separate page be given to each Sub-district instead of inserting a folder as heretofore; and that in the future the reports be by charges instead of by

churches, as now; and that all assessments be made in dollars and all reports in dollars, and omit the column for cents, thus lessening the labor

of making out this table, and the cost of printing it.

In many instances members of our church move into a community or a town where we have a church and continue to hold their membership elsewhere. In some cases a church in town languishes when there are enough Methodist Protestant members living in the town to make a strong church. Sometimes the pastor of the church where such hold their membership encourages such a state of things. This is a short-sighted policy and is hurtful to the church. If a church member is any good anywhere, he is more good where he lives, if he holds his membership there. And that is the only place he should hold it, if there is a church of his denomination there. When a member moves out of the bounds of the charge on which he belongs, his pastor should notify the pastor of the church nearest to his new home, and should co-operate with such pastor in getting him to move his membership.

On page 36, Conference Minutes of 1897, is the following: "Resolved, That the President shall appoint a committee of three to recommend to the Annual Conference a three years' course of study for licentiates, the annual renewal of their license to depend on passing a satisfactory examination before the Committee of Examination provided for on page 62, Section 3, of the Discipline; provided that when any licentiate shall have passed three satisfactory annual examinations including the entire course, the renewal of his license shall no longer depend upon such examina-

tion."

I would recommend that this resolution, together with the course of study as found in the Minutes of 1898, also the Conference Election Law, and date of the election of members of such committees as are elected for a term of years, be published in the Conference Minutes every year.

The financial question is still a leading one with us. How may we get willingness to average up somewhere near ability? Some seem blind and deaf to all financial obligation, and cannot be induced to open their eyes nor unstop their ears; still I think that there is some improvement. I believe more charges will report all assessments paid in full than ever before. Though the salaries of pastors is not what it should be by any means, we are doing better. The report of salaries last year shows in average assessment for pastor's salary an increase of \$18, and in average deficit, a decrease of \$19, making the average received \$37 more than for the previous year. And I am hopeful that the figures this year will show continued gain.

If your pastors are worthy at all—and none are more worthy—they are worthy of a better support. And by receiving better support they would be enabled to give better service. Four hundred dollars should be the minimum salary for a pastor. Few, if any of our charges, pay what they should. There seems to be an idea among some that ours is a cheap church, and the sooner that idea can be exploded, the better. We do not need a member who joins us or stays with us because he thinks so.

One way to remedy this would be for our pastors to demand a living salary, and for this Conference to refuse to assign a pastor to any church

till it has paid its previous pastor all it owes him.

It seems to me that the paramount work of our Conference at this time is the Church Extension, and it should not be sidetracked for anything. Our Conference has work in three States, and in every one of them are inviting fields awaiting us. But will they wait? Our people, like other people, are moving to town, and we should have churches in town for them. Our loss has already been great because of our tardiness in entering the towns. There are a dozen towns within the bounds of our Con-

ference that we should enter at once. Every year of delay means loss to

us.

At this writing it looks like the pastoral supply for the coming year will be insufficient, as several men will probably drop out, and I know of none to take their places. But it is with pleasure that I tell you that there are eight young men in the bounds of our Conference in school, who have the ministry in view and others expect to enter school soon. It will, however, be some time before many of these are ready for work, and the need is increasing all the time.

I have visited every charge in the district except Caldwell, and on nearly all the charges I have visited all the appointments. My failure to reach all the appointments on one circuit caused a failure of nearly half

on President's claim for that field.

It has been necessary for me to be ready to give advice to all who

asked it and to some who did not.

I have traveled thousands of miles by rail and hundreds by private conveyance, and have dispatched hundreds of letters and cards. I have not written as much for publication as I should, and I hereby apologize to those pastors from whose charges I published no report, and also to the readers of our church papers who have been interested in what I have written, for not writing more.

I have written brethren asking them to write for publication, to write on Church Extension, and some have kindly done so and some have not.

The burdens have been much lightened by the kindness and thoughtfulness of the brethren. Through all the labors and trials the Lord has

mercifully brought me.

And now, brethren, thanking you every one for your efforts for my convenience, comfort, and pleasure, and praying the choicest blessings of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost upon you, I am,

To the Members of the Conference Brotherhood:

DEAR BRETHREN:—Another year has passed, and again we rejoice that our number has not been diminished by death.

The Brotherhood was organized four years ago. We estimated that the number of deaths would probably average one a year. There have

been three deaths, and I feel sure that this was a safe estimate.

The fact that the Brotherhood offers its advantages to all, otherwise eligible, without regard to age or condition of health, and yet maintains a death rate so low as to make the cost probably less than any other insurance, would seem to make it worthy of commendation, from the standpoints both of beneficence and of business.

We now have forty-nine beneficiary members and thirty-six non-bene-

ficiary members.

At the last meeting Rev. J. H. Gilbreath expressed his intention of applying for beneficiary membership and advanced the initiation fee, 50 cents. His formal application was not presented to the Trustees, and of course not acted upon. The 50 cents is in the treasury, and will be turned over to his heirs if it can be ascertained who they are.

REPORT OF COLLEGE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS.

1. We recommend that this committee be enlarged by the addition of seven ministers.

2. We recommend that this committee make an earnest and syste-

matic canvass for additional pledges and funds.

3. We recommend that this committee be directed to procure a college site wherever and whenever it may deem it prudent to do so, provided that no deal be made which will impose financial obligations on this Conference.

We recommend that these be substantial, commodious and attractive, that students may be drawn and held and the work of the college facilitated.

II. PERSONNEL OF THE FACULTY.

The moral influence of teachers should be considered no less than their ability as instructors in some particular branch of knowledge, in order that the formation of Christian character may be promoted as well as the acquisition of knowledge and intellectual power.

III. CURRICULA.

The limited time given us forbids our attempting to give even in outline a complete scheme of studies. We can only state the principles which we think should be observed in laying out courses of study. We believe, too, that the best guarantee that the institution will serve its pur-

pose will be in the character of the men chosen to manage it.

Without breaking wholly with the past, the demands of modern life should have prime consideration in laying out the courses of study. We should avoid being narrowly utilitarian on the one hand and liberal to the point of impracticability on the other. The mind of the student should be liberalized by being freed from prejudices and at the same With love of truth should be time it should be trained for service. developed desire for usefulness, and in teaching truth useful knowledge The student should be brought to know should be given precedence. his environment—that with which he will have to do. which he lives, mankind with whom he lives, God under whom he lives-all should be known in some degree. The extent of knowledge of different subjects needed by the student varies with his future occupa-Instead of fixed courses for all, there should be a wide range of studies and liberty of choice. Still there are studies essential to all, and these should be required of all who receive degrees from the institution.

The institution should in its courses reach down to meet the needs of those who come without much previous training, and at the same time be prepared to lead up to the degree of knowledge and culture given in our

best colleges.

IV. ADJUNCT ENTERPRISES.

We recommend that the college be so located as to make it possible for men disposed to do so to aid students by giving them employment part of the time in some useful industry. Adjunct enterprises should not be so planted as to interfere with the work of the college or to mar the pleasantness of its situation, but should be located near enough to be convenient to students who work for their support.

V. CONTROL OF THE COLLEGE.

We recommend that this be committed to a board of twelve trustees, at least nine of whom shall be members of the Methodist Protestant Church in the North Carolina District, and that the trustees be chosen by the contributors to the fund for the building and endowment of the college, each \$5 contributed to entitle the contributor to one vote. When, however, through the withdrawing of contributions in tuition or through the death of contributors less than half the amount invested in buildings, grounds, and endowment is represented by the body of living contributors, then and thereafter vacancies in the board shall be filled by the board itself, subject to the approval of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church. In the first election of trustees, four to be elected for two years, four for four years, and four for six years. Biennially thereafter four to be elected for six years.

Report 6.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COLLEGES.

Some knowledge is intuitive, some is acquired. Every man who has moral responsibility knows that he ought to do right and that he ought

not to do wrong. Of this, neither the preacher nor the teacher can make

him more certain.

But what is right, and what is wrong? These are questions that often perplex. What good men of the last century answered in the affirmative, good men of the present answer in the negative. And even today good men differ on important moral questions. Thus the answer to these questions does not depend upon the goodness of those who answer, but upon their enlightenment.

It is one of the functions of the church to equip her adherents for answering intelligently all questions pertaining to morals. To do this, she must educate. Especially is this true of the Methodist Protestant Church. Our laity does not believe that the ministry is infallible. They are a liberty-loving people, and reserve the right to think for themselves.

And the ministry would not have it otherwise.

But liberty of thought without a knowledge of the laws of thought, is dangerous. Hence we must commit ourselves unreservedly to a policy of education. Western Maryland College, Adrian College, and Kansas City University are doing commendable work. But these institutions are too distant to meet the masses within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference. This committee recommends, therefore, that this Conference give the strongest possible support to the effort now being made to establish a college within our bounds.

The fact that there are so few parsonages in our district is to be deplored, and we recommend that each pastor make an earnest effort to build one on his charge.

We recommend that the financial reports be made by the churches as heretofore, and that all assessments be made in dollars as recommended in the President's report. We heartily endorse that part of the report referring to members moving from one locality to another, and trust that our church, as a whole, may profit by the same. We recommend that part of the report referring to publishing of the course of study for licentiates, and election law, and date of election of committees who are elected for a term of years.

Your committee is gratified to learn of the tendency of our church to pay the pastors a living salary, and refer that part of the report to the consideration of the Committee on Finance, and also that part of the

report referring to church extension.

REV. J. H. GILBREATH.

Brethren of the N. C. Conference:

It is seldom that we meet in annual session without being made sensi-

ble of some new-made vacancy among us. This year is no exception to the rule; for we realize there has gone out a presence from us, whose "ups and downs" many of us were made familiar with by his own simple story.

James Hugh Gilbreath's name must this year be transferred from the roll of the living to the roll of the honored dead, in the annals of the N.

C. Conference.

A notice in *Our Church Record* of March 13th, 1902, states that he died at his son's home in Smithfield, N. C., March 5th, and that he was buried at Union Chapel, Vance county.

The county of Guilford is his birthplace. He leaves a brother near the city of Greensboro, N. C., also a sister. He lacked but a little of

being three score and ten years old.

Your committee is informed that in early life he connected himself with the Society at Moriah church, in his native county. He became a preacher, and during the Civil War was the pastor on Granville circuit for three years. After this he was associated with Rev. W. C. Kennett on Randolph circuit; thence back to Granville circuit five years. Later on, he served on Roanoke circuit four years, an acceptable supply, adding many names to her church membership, and doing much in making church music better by establishing singing schools in various localities there, and this he did in other parts of the district as well. He organized the church at Antioch, Vance county, and served this society when the house was built. He also served as pastor on Albemarle and LaGrange circuits, and for two years had charge of the Randleman and Cedar Falls work, in Randolph county.

Becoming unsettled in the doctrines of the Methodist Protestant church, his removal from her fellowship followed. For a number of years thereafter he dwelt and worked among the Friends. In 1899 Bro. Gilbreath acknowledged his errors in doctrine and mistaken church relations, and again united with the church of his first love, at Union Chapel, Granville circuit, and the following Annual Conference his elder's credentials were restored by that body. He deeply regretted his straying from the principles of our church as much as his sincerest friends ever did. He stated that he loved the M. P. church all the time, notwithstanding

his severance from her fellowship.

Those who knew him in his younger days tell us that as a preacher, he was much above the average, and as a pastor he was sympathetic and easily approached. He was of an affectionate disposition, and his congeniality with the young people won for him many friends. We believe in the sincerity of his friendship, and in his humility and goodness.

We are glad he died in his home church, in the church of his earliest love and richest experiences. He has followed his wife, Miss Hunt, who passed to her reward several years ago. We trust they rest in peace.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORDINANCES.

Christianity is emphatically a spiritual dispensation. Simple in its external religious services. Protestants universally admit but two sacra-

mental ordinances of the Christian church-Baptism and the Lord's

Supper

The Methodist Protestant church recognizes the Lord's Supper and Baptism as institutions of Christ's own express appointment. In the inspired record we find the following: "And as they were eating, Jesus took bread, and blessed it and broke it and gave it to the disciples, and said, Take, eat; this is my body. And he took the cup, and gave thanks and gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of it; for this is my blood of the New Testament which is shed for many for the remission of sins."

The bread and the wine direct our faith to the atonement of Christ—to his broken body and shed blood—exhibiting his redeeming mercy and love in suffering for sinners that he might bring them to God. Those who have the interests of our church at heart regret that this ordinance is

too much neglected.

Your committee does not want to lay too much stress on the ordinances of the church; but where the Lord's Supper is administered only once in one year, it looks like neglect. And there ought to be a remedy, It is also a painful fact that a large number of our people do not avail themselves of the opportunity they have of partaking of this ordinance. The causes which keep members of the church away from the table of the Lord are, no doubt, many. Some of these stumbling blocks amount to a mere misunderstanding, and may be removed by a simple explanation. We recommend that the pastors make earnest effort to clear up the difficulty.

Baptism is the other ordinance of the church. "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost." Here we date the divine origin of bap-

tism as a perpetual ordinance of the Christian church.

We think all persons applying for membership in our church should first be baptized. Infant baptism is being neglected by the parents of our church to a degree that threatens in a few years to make it an institution of the past. We recommend that all pastors explain more fully this ordinance. Discipline, page 142, we find: "Infant baptism should be administered monthly in all our churches, and oftener when necessary."

Your Committee on Pastoral Work report the following: A pastor is a preacher. "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." He also must be a teacher. "Go ye therefore and teach all nations." He should also be an exhorter. Paul advised Timothy to "teach and exhort." To do this, he must have his text well in hand. References at his command. Then exhort his hearers to accept the teaching. This will require study—some subjects, much study. The laity should remember this. Some minds need more time than other minds. Study to show thyself approved unto God, says the Scripture, whether man approves or not. The pastor must preach to save sinners as well as to feed the flock. Then visit. Yes, visit, not to kill time, or to make a tally, but to do good. Show an interest in laudable occupations of those visited, and they will more likely take an interest in your work. If you jest, be careful about the quality of the jest, and who is present, that your pleasantry be not spoken of as evil. Never carry a long face or a cloud into a sick room, but let your countenance be bright

with cheerful holiness. Study to be a wise and impartial counsellor, in matters of difference between brethren, and do not seek to avoid a duty, in order to be popular. We think the laity that have thinking faculties and will use them, will be satisfied. Respectfully submitted,

That we will not support or do anything that has a tendency to encourage the manufacture, sale, or use of intoxicants as a beverage.

2. That we will do all we can conscientiously to suppress and abolish the manufacture, sale, and use of intoxicants, except for medical, mechanical and scientific purposes.

That we are in hearty sympathy with the present anti-canteen law as passed by Congress and approved by President McKinley, and we not only oppose any effort to repeal this law, but call upon our representatives in Congress to oppose any movement for its repeal.

4. That a copy of these resolutions, signed by the President and Secretary of this Conference, be put in the hands of each representative of

North Carolina in the Senate and House of Representatives.

Report 24.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

We still regard the financial problem as one of the greatest that confronts the church, and the nearer we are to its solution, the greater will be our success. The King of our lives loves a cheerful giver, and our people need the experience of the blessedness of giving. No member is in good standing who does not contribute of his means to the support of the church, unless disabled physically. No charge ought to be considered in good standing that does not fulfill its obligations, nor ought to be considered in good standing unless the obligation assumed is commensurate with ability. We believe that this Annual Conference ought to

express itself upon the subject of the assessment for pastors; and believing that the poorest individual, not weakened by the decrepitude of age, or incapacitated by disease or accident from labor, to be able to pay at least one dollar annually to pastor's support, and an equal amount to general interests, while many whom God has blessed with the good things of this life, can and do give many times as much, we recommend that the Conference express itself in hearty terms disapproving any lower assessment for pastor's support by any charge of a less average than one dollar per member enrolled. We recommend that in the distribution of favors Conference recognize the loyal and liberal charges. That some pastors are successful in securing the amounts assessed for Conference claims on almost any field, while others fail on almost any, proves that some are more faithful or more capable, and in this case, too, we recommend that the rewards and honors go to the deserving.

We believe that charges which provide parsonages for their pastors should have due credit therefor in the financial report, as rent thus saved is equal to money paid for that purpose. We therefore recommend that a fair allowance for rent or six per ceat, on investment be added to amount assessed for pastor and amount paid to him, on charges having parsonages. We further recommend that where a pastor does not occupy the parsonage the rent should be paid to the pastor. We recommend the adoption of the individual assessment plan for securing the pastor's salary and general interests. We recommend that the pastors bring this matter to the attention of the First Quarterly Conference, and urge and insist upon the adoption of this plan. We recommend that the

assessments be as follows:

ON LITERATURE.

1. It has been somewhat difficult for your committee to prepare a report on Literature, knowing that the report will be embodied in the Minutes, read by comparatively few, and put into practice by fewer still. But recognizing the fact that literature is the greatest legacy that has been left us by past generations, and that it is through reading that the

great minds of the past and present become our servants, we are glad to

make a few suggestions, even though they may help only a few.

2. In literature the Bible stands pre-eminent, and is a book that ought to be thoroughly studied by every Christian worker. ter and Sunday school worker especially ought to know their Bible. There is history and poetry and gens of thought in the Bible that no school can afford to be without.

3. We are in the midst of an educational era, and as we cast about we see that the men who have been leaders in thought and action, are those whose minds have been trained. The founders of the Methodist Protestant church were men and women who read and thought for themselves, and if her principles are to be sustained and perpetuated, our young people must be trained to read. Inspire in the young people of our church a love for books, and you introduce them to friends who will counsel and guide them through the difficulties of life.

4. Especially would we urge upon our people the necessity of using Methodist Protestant literature, and placing it wherever possible, so that others may come in contact with it. If *Our Church Record* and *The Methodist Protestant* could take the places of secular papers in many of our homes, ours would be a more intelligent and a more pious people.

5. We heartily commend to all our Sunday schools our own literature, and in addition to the regular literature, *The Morning Guide* is an excellent help for all Sunday school workers. We recommend reading clubs, wherever practicable, in connection with Sunday schools and C. E. Societies.

6. We also call attention to the fact that *The Missionary Record* is now published in Greensboro, by Mrs. J. F. McCulloch, and should be included in the literature of our homes and reading rooms.

ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Your committee believing that best results can be obtained from Sab-

bath schools that are most thoroughly organized, recommend:

1. That each pastor organize his charge into a circuit Sunday school convention for the improvement of the work of the individual school and the compacting of the Sunday school interest of the charge. That it elect president and secretary, and that each Sabbath school superintendent be a member of the executive committee of said charge, whose duty it shall be to arrange for the convention to meet as often as will be practicable and profitable. That this convention inaugurate a movement to reach every child outside of the schools on the charge.

2. That these circuit conventions be organized into sub-district conventions, whose president shall be appointed by the stationing authority at each annual session, and that each circuit convention chairman, with the president, constitute the executive committee, who shall arrange for the meetings of the sub-district conventions, which shall be held

annually.

3. That the President of the Annual Conference appoint a committee to prepare a normal course for the better training of Sunday school teachers. This normal to be conducted under the direction of the subdistrict president.

4. We again urge upon our people the importance of seeing that our

own literature is used in our Sabbath schools.

5. We would recommend the discouragement of union Sunday schools by our people, except where it is impossible to hold schools without such combination.

Election Law of the North Carolina Conference.

The Second Quarterly Conference of each pastoral charge shall nominate double the number of laymen to which the field of labor may be entitled, as delegates to the Annual Conference; the pastor shall announce from each pulpit the names of the nominees, and appoint a day, which shall be that on which his appointments shall fall at each church, if practicable, for taking the vote by ballot, for the number to which the charge may be entitled; the ballots cast by members over twenty-one years of age, to be received by class leaders and stewards, under the supervision of the pastor, and by *them* to *be counted*, and the count to be forwarded to the Third Quarterly Conference, to be compared by that body; the brother or brethren receiving the *plurality* of votes shall be declared duly elected, and a certificate shall be given accordingly, and the pastor immediately after Third Quarterly Conference shall send to the Secretary of the Annual Conference the address of both the delegate-elect and the alternate.



Rules of Order for the Government of North Carolina Conference.

After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's annual report.

2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.

The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.

4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of the Scripture and prayer, under the direction of the President.

5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.

6. It shall be the duty of the chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal re-

flections or irrelevant debate.

The chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.

8. All the committees shall be appointed by the chair, unless

otherwise ordered by the Conference.

9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.

10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.

11. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the chair.

No member shall be permitted to speak more than once on any question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.

No person shall pass between the chair and a member while speaking, nor interrupt the speaker except by permission to explain.

14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently

loud to disturb the Conference.

Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.

Members are required to vote in all cases, except excused

therefrom by the Conference.

17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same

shall be seconded.

18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn. and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.

All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken 19.

on the main question.

20. All questions of order arising after the previous question

has been called for shall be decided without debate.

The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of onefifth of the members present.

All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.

No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be

called up again during the session.

No person shall speak more then five minutes without permission of the Conference.

No committee shall meet during the session of Conference. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.

PROCEEDINGS.

The seventy-eighth session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church met in Winston M. P. Church, November 18, 1903, at 10 a.m. Religious exercises conducted by the President, Rev. T. M. Johnson. The roll was called.

The President then proceeded to read his annual report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

Dear Brethren: Another twelve months has passed and through the kindness of our Heavenly Father, we all, without the loss of one, are assembled together in annual session. The fact that no one of our number has been called away should be to us a source of much gratitude and great joy.

Fields Supplied.

The fields left unsupplied by the last Conference were supplied The fields left unsupplied by the last Conference were supplied as soon after adjournment as practical, as follows: Alamance, Rev. W. L. Harris; Chatham, Rev. D. A. Highfill; Cleveland, Rev. W. C. Kennett; Concord, Bro. C. A. Swift, during the summer vacation and on his return to school, Bro. J. A. Burgess; Gastonia, Rev. H. F. Lowe; LaGrange, Rev. J. F. Dosier; Lincoln, Rev. T. F. McCulloch; Monroe, Rev. J. H. Turner; Rockingham, Rev. Bryant Lovin; West Lexington, Rev. J. W. Self.

Soon after Conference Rev. C. L. Whitaker was released from Granville and Rev. G. W. Holmes from Roanoke. Rev. C. L. Whitaker was assigned to Roanoke and Rev. G. W. Holmes to Granville. About three months ago Rev. C. E. Forlines was released from Albemarle, since which time Rev. Geo. H. Leary, who had been made associate pastor of that field in the early spring,

had been made associate pastor of that field in the early spring, has had charge of the work.

Appointed.

Superintendents of Christian Endeavor for the various Sub-dis-

tricts were appointed as directed by the last Conference.

The Committee to devise plans for Sub-district Conferences as directed by resolution on page 7 of last minutes, not having been appointed during the session of last Conference, was appointed during the year, which Committee will offer its report to this Conference.

Resigned.

Mr. J. S. Hunter and Prof. J. Allen Holt as members of the Special College Committee tendered to me as President of the Conference each his resignation. Believing as I do, that the President of the Conference has not the authority to accept the resignation of members of this committee created by the Conference, I stated to these brethren that I would refer the matter of their resignation to the Conference which I now do.

Encouraging Facts.

While there are difficulties, some of which have not yet been overcome, there are facts because of which we should be encouraged. Among these are: Good revivals; a hopeful interest among the laity; a number of churches rebuilt or remodeled, the style and finish of which show a marked improvement in church architecture; a church built at two important points—Mebane and Concord; a good financial record concerning such claims as have been presented most and pressed; Pastor's salary increased for the coming year on a number of fields; young men in preparation for the ministry, namely, Geo. L. Curry, S. W. Taylor, and I think Aaron Devenport at Western Maryland College, T. C. Coble at Guilford College, B. M. Williams last year at Creswell, now teaching, J. E. Pritchard at Liberty High School, Thomas Matthews at Yadkin College High School, C. A. Swift at Whitsett Institute. Should we not think of this last named fact as an answer to our prayers of a year or two ago and be thankful? Meantime continue to pray the Lord of the harvest that He send forth laborers into His harvest. Besides these young men in preparation there are several other men of families preparing for the same great work.

What We Have Not Done.

We, for some reason, not very well known to me, have not very generally held the "Diamond Jublibee" celebration. Nor do we seem in some instances to have worked very thoroughly the financial plans laid at the beginning of the year. I recommend that we plan our work well and then work our plans thoroughly to the finish. It is not the part of men but of children to start a good thing with zeal and grow tired or careless and quit before it is finished.

What I Have Not Done.

For lack of time I have not been prompt with correspondence; have not followed up an interesting—inveresting because it promised to be profitable—correspondence with laymen concerning the financial work of the church; have not visited Sub-district Conference except one. I did not visit Caldwell because the time I proposed to go did not suit the pastor or the field or both; did not visit Burlington or Granville because of an agreement reached through the respective Pastors that I would not be required do so; did not visit Henderson because I knew the spirit and temper of that church that it does not require a visit from the President when he is needed more elsewhere; did not visit Vance because I understood at the first that I would not be required to do so, later when requested I could not because that field had been left out of the plan. My purpose was to find a few fields that would not require the usual visit that this might be the beginning of a modification of our present plan to the extent that the President might be excused from visiting at least a few of the stronger and better developed fields in order that he may have time for visiting the Sub-district Conferences where dates do not conflict too seriously with his other work, and for keeping in touch by correspondence with the weaker and more needy fields. Such a correspondence was commenced this year but had to be dropped for lack of time.

I recommend that the President be excused from visiting the stronger, better developed fields to give time for the extra work above mentioned.

Our Opportunity.

The term progress, I think, names the spirit of the age. If the desire for wealth (it may be a proper desire) quickens man's activities until it is said that North Carolina has made a "marvelous record of progress" during the last ten years, surely a desire for the salvation of men and for the extending of God's kingdom should quicken our activities until our Church's "record of progress" may be termed "marvelous." North Carolina as a state has never before made such strides; we as a Church should make such strides as never before. North Carolina by comparison of census reports is ranked as the most progressive of the Southern States and is excelled by only one State in the Union. The State has in ten years nearly doubled per year the money value of her farm products and more than doubled that of her manufactured products. Such is the progress of the State in which we work. Surely this is a State in which a Church may make great progress.

Our population is shifting. The people are adjusting themselves to the new condition. This gives us as a Church an opportunity to readjust ourselves. We have lamented much that we have not entered the towns. We now have another chance. New towns are being built, old ones are building larger. The last census shows that our tide of population is setting townward. If we are wise, we will take it at high tide. If we fail now to enter the

towns, our last mistake will be worse than the first.

More Money.

To do this more money is needed. The Lord has given our people the more money needed, will they use it for His cause? Our manufactured products more than doubled and our farm products nearly doubled. We need and must have the full \$3,000,00 for Church Extension work. We have played at raising this amount long enough. We should raise it next year. I would therefore recommend that an extraordinary effort me made the coming year to raise the full \$3,000.00. On most fields this is largely with the Pastors, on some fields it will be exceedingly difficult or impossible to raise the amount because of a strange prejudice against the raising of this fund. But the people should be taught and the contributing of the funds properly urged by the Pastors. I further recommend that the Board of Church Extension consider the advisability of arranging with certain Pastors in different parts of the State to give such time as they can spare from their own work to visit other fields for the purpose of raising Church Extension funds, perhaps collecting them for some particular point, the Board bearing the necessary expenses. The success of Bro. C. J. Edwards, collecting for the Edenton Church, would seem to commend the plan.

Education.

"Education" has come to be a watch cry in the State of North Carolina. More schools and better equipment in the aim of the leaders in this educational revival; more education and better training is the desire of the individual among the young people. Breathing as we do this atmosphere of educational revival, we as a Church should unite in the establishing and equipping of a school for our own people, and for any others who wish it, as good as the best and as inexpensive as the cheapest of similar grade and worth. If we would strengthen our cause, we must strengthen

our individual members; and you strengthen an individual by making stronger the seat of his strength, namely, the head not neglecting the heart meantime. Others, it is true, will educate our young people if we do not, but they will not educate them for us, that is, they will not do it for nothing. They may not charge much money; but in many or most instances they make heavy charges of sentiment and good will for the educator and our denomination pays the bill. Sometimes they take the individual himself for pay. We should create the educational atmosphere our young people are to breathe while they are in course of training. I recommend that our people make united effort to provide educational facilities for our young people in this age of educational revival.

Our Church Papers.

To have an intelligent membership concerning our Church, it is necessary to have a membership which reads our own church literature. Too many of our members there are who do not take even one of our papers. Our Church Record or The Methodist Protestant or both should go into every Methodist Protestant home in the North Carolina Conference. This must be accomplished, if at all, largely through our Pastors. One endeavoring to get subscribers for Our Church Record meets these objections; "the paper is too small;" "our preachers and leading laymen do not write enough for the paper concerning our general interests and the work of the Church;" "the paper does not contain enough editorial matter concerning these same matters." I therefore recommend that the Editor and the Publishing Committee confer together and endeavor to remove or make less these objections. further recommend that a special effort be made during the coming year by our Pastors to increase the circulation of these papers.

Other Reccommendations.

I recommend as follows:

More system in transacting the business of the Confer-To this end it is urged that all committees and all members of Conference co-operate in following our "order of business." That during the first days of Conference short sessions or none at all after the first day be held during the afternoon, in order to give committees time to do their work. the Boundary Committee do as much as possible of its work very early in the session.
2. That a thorough revision of all circuit and local class books

be required.

3. It is amazing with what ease and grace some of our Pastors admit lack of information concerning certain facts connected with their respective fields. Had all the Pastors answered questions, or rather replied to questions asked in quarterly report blanks, as did some, I would think possibly the questions are unreasonable; but a goodly number gave the information asked for in each instance. I am persuaded that no business man could attain unto the highest degree of success with so much of so vital importance connected with his business that he does not know. We as ministers of the gospel should recognize the fact that certain business principles are essential in our work, one of which is a thorough acquaintance with the facts connected with the work in hand. therefore recommend that some of our Pastors endeavor better to acquaint themselves with the condition, the forces and the resources of their respective fields.

4. I recommend that some of our Pastors and in some instances the laity of our Church show more regard for the authority vested in the Discipline of our Church and in the Annual Conference. We do no need an office or a man in an office with more authority. but we do need that our people regard the authority of the Discipline and of the Annual Conference.

5. I recommend that Asheville as a possible point for a new church be considered, that this matter be thoroughly investigated and that the advisability or the inadvisability of such an under-

taking be decided.

I recommend that this Conference provide funds to meet the necessary expenses of the Program Committee for celebrating the seventy fifth anniversary of our organization as a Church. (See

Report 26, page 31 of last minutes.)

That the Finance Committee be permanent, composed of two ministers and two laymen elected by the Conference as follows: One minister to be elected for four years, one layman for three years, one minister elected for two years, one layman for one year. Then a member elected each year to serve for four years to fill each vacancy caused by expiration of term of office.

And now, brethren of the Conference, both ministerial and lay, these recommendations, made in a spirit of brotherly love and in love for the cause, are made to as loyal, as faithful, as self-sacrificing band of workers as our land—the best land on earth—affords and to as good people as there are in the world, indeed, some of the very salt of the earth. It is because of your loyalty, your faithfulness, your self-sacrificing spirit, and your goodness that I have thought it the worth while to recommend that which I think to be for our improvement.

Now, recognizing God's care over us all and His directing of the work and the workers, and thanking Pastors and people for their

unstinted kindness and hospitality, I am,

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee being impressed with the importance of the Sunday School as one of the chief agencies of the church for the extension of the Kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, believes that its interests should be given special care and attention by each pastor as he administers the affairs of the church among the flock over which he has been placed, that the lambs may be brought in the fold and fed.

To this end we recommend that efforts be made to induce the parents and older members to attend the schools, and carry and not simply say to the children, go, believing that the presence of the older ones will give more dignity, importance and influence of the teaching of the Bible. We believe that a Sunday School should be in each society, and that our leading laymen should be urged to establish schools in destitute localities where the lambs and older ones are suffering for the bread of life. We urge the importance of using our own literature in all our schools. We recommend that our church through its Sunday Schools cooperate with the Interdenominational Sunday School Association of the State in its township, county and State work.

Report No. 13. PASTORAL WORK.

This is a subject about which different opinions are entertain-We suppose that the object in appointing a committee on Pastoral Work and having a report from that committee is to as-

certain the church's conception of it.

The deviration of the word pastoral aids us in comprehending its impart. The word suggests the work of a shepherd. A shepherd's work is to care for sheep, a pastor's work is to care for souls, is to care for the spiritual interests, the highest interests of men. A pastor in the fullest sense is a minister, but we suppose that in this connection is to be considered a pastor's work outside of his ministerial duties.

The shepherd knows his sheep by name. A pastor's knowledge of his people is facilitated very much by visiting them in their homes and places of business, and there is to the true pastor a sublime pleasure in going to a house and saying in the spirit in which the injunction was given "Peace be to this house."

The most needy and at the time of their greatest need should have pastoral care, for the apostle said, "Pure religion is to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction." This, however, is a duty that devolves on others besides pastors.

A good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep. A pastor's work demands his whole life, or all his time. As a rule a pastor should undertake no other work than his pastoral and ministerial work.

COMMITTEE ON ORDINANCES.

The Methodist Protestant Church recognizes the ordinances of the Lord's Supper and Baptism. Our Savior, before His death, instituted the supper and commanded His followers thus to com-

memorate His death, until He come again.

This ordinance is of great importance to the church, and should not be neglected by any of its members. On some charges this ordinance is not administered often enough, probably not more than once or twice a year. Many church members do not avail themselves of the benefits of this ordinance. They refuse to commemorate the death and sufferings of their Savior who bought them with His own precious blood on the cross. Christ wept over Jerusalem and doubtless He weeps over negligent church members today.

We recommend that all our pastors explain more fully the design of this ordinance and urge their members to avail themselves of the spiritual benefits it brings to all who observe it according

to the teaching of the Word.

Baptism with water is another ordinance of the church that ought not to be neglected. All persons applying for membership in our church should be baptized before they are received into full membership. Christ said, "go teach all nations baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost."

If this important command is obeyed, children will have to be baptized as well as grown people, for they compose a large part of a nation. It is a glorious privilege parents have to dedicate their children to God in the holy ordinance of baptism; by this act they put their children under His care and bring themselves under renewed obligations to bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord which is their indispensable duty.

We recommend that all our pastors set forth plainly and forcibly this privilege and the obligations parents are under to dedi-

cate their children to God in baptism.

ON COLLEGES.

The doors of Kansas City University, of Adrian, and Western Maryland College are wide open to our young people who wish to equip themselves for life's duties.

We recommend that our young people avail themselves of the benefits offered by these institutions.

There are three of our young men in Kansas City.

We have three young men at Western Maryland College preparing for the ministry.

The Westminster Theological Seminary has passed through a year of prosperity. There are 19 students new registered. A generous layman recently gave \$2,000.00 to the Scholarship Fund. The will of the late Dr. Drinkhouse contains a legacy of \$1,000.00 for the same fund. The Library has received from the estate of Dr. Drinkhouse about 800 volumes.

Last year nine men gave \$100 apiece to the Scholarship Fund for the education of young men for the ministry.

We urge that earnest effort be made to raise the Seminary assessment. That pastors send to the president of the Seminary the names of any young men on their charges whom they believe called to preach. That all our Circuits set apart for special prayer the month of May and our Stations set apart the second Sunday in May as a day of prayer that young men may be called into the ministry.

We rejoice that an increased number of our young people are in school, in college and university within our own State and in other States. We congratulate them for the high stand they have taken in their classes and in the moral personnel of those institutions.

We appreciate the great work that is being done for the youth of the South by our own Professors Holt at Oak Ridge Institute. We also profoundly appreciate their services to the ministry of our own Church in their special favors to students preparing for the ministry.

We gratefully note the faithful efforts of Rev. J. F. McCulloch to found a College within our own borders. We urge that education be our watch-cry until the sentiment aroused within the past few years be crystalized into the very best educational facilities for our young people.

Letter from Rev. G. E. McManiman, Secretary Board of Home Missions.

West Lafayette, Ohio, November 10th, 1903.

To the Officers and Members of the Annual Conference:

DEAR BRETHREN:—I am very sorry to be deprived of the privilege of meeting with you in your annual session and enjoying Christian fellowship with you for a few days. But some special duties that cannot be laid aside make it necessary for me to be engaged elesewhere at the present time. When you are in session I will be in the far west looking after our interests there.

I am glad to report to you that the cause of Home Missions is in a very flourishing condition at the present time. There is only one exception to this fact and that is found in the amount of money that is being contributed by the Annual Conferences through their regular channels. During the past year there was no growth in that direction at all. It was only by securing funds from other sources that we were able to do the excellent work

that was done.

Every appointment now under the care of the Board is doing excellent work. Every piece of property now owned by it is productive. A quiet but steady and healthful growth is going on in every one of these appointments. There never was a time when the soundness of the institution appealed to the business sense of

the church as now.

Under the present policy of the Board the bulk of the funds are being made of permanent value to the church. Last year nearly seventy per cent. of the entire income from the Annual Conferences was so invested that it will continue to do permanent work for the church, and the cause of our Lord. This fact is worthy of more than passing attention. If, as the years go by, the money given by the church is so invested that it will return to the Board after it has made some church self supporting, to be sent out again and yet again on the same blessed errand, the question of the growth of the church at home will have been solved.

The method by which this is being brought about is to loan the money that is being asked for by those churches that are in need instead of donating it. The loan is made on a mortgage that will run, in most cases, ten years without interest. One thousand dollars may just as well build ten churches in a hundred years as to be perpetually invested in one church. This method is every-

where appealing to the best business sense of the church.

The one great point of failure is found in the fact that a large number of the ministers of the church are entirely too indifferent to the cause of Home Missions. They seem to do what is done by them because they are compelled to do so by the law of the church and not because they are profoundly interested in the advancement of the cause of Jesus Christ in any large sense. If they felt, as they ought to feel, that the future of the cause of the Master in the whole world largely depended on the advancement of His cause in this country, they would be aroused to some definite interest in the great and important work of Home Missions. If they were filled with a realization of the fact that every Christian man and woman in this country is faced by two others who are not Christians, at all, they might awaken and something might be done.

Brethren, may we not pray you to awaken! The need of the hour is a revival. This revival should and must begin with the ministry. It must not be simply a revival in your local church, but one that will take in this entire land so far as your interest in

it goes. It must touch purse as well as parish. It must produce "shekels" as well as shouts! The cause of Home Missions will be just what the ministers decide it shall be. We are in your hands! The church of the future is in your hands! God help us to be Faithfully yours.

Letter from Rev. J. C. Berrien.

Center Moriches, Suffolk Co., N. Y., November 17th, 1903.

To the President and Members of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church :-

DEAR BRETHREN: -I had hoped until to day to attend this session of your conference; but an attack of laryngitis which has troubled me for seveal days, still makes it unwise for me to leave home. I would be unfit for public speaking should I go. I enclose a statement of balance due the Board of Ministerial Education from the former beneficiaries, who are now members of your Conference. Please appoint a committee to receive these payments, and make announcement in Conference of this appoint-May I ask that the attention of the brethren be called to the importance of making as large payments as they can this year, in view of the quadrennial report to be made to the General Conference next May.

Your Conference demonstrates its interest in Ministerial Education, by its contributions of money, and the men that have been helped from your district, at our institutions. But there is a widespread need of a greater number of suitable men to be in preparation for the ministry in our church. Our experience is, that these men will only be found by wise and persistent search on the part of our pastors and the representative of our Board, or insti-

tutions of the church.

Men are still being called of God into the ministry, but for various reasons many do not heed the call. Our Board would urge the ministry to preach definitely upon this subject. To lay before the most gifted of our young men the claims of Christ upon them for service in his ministry. We would call the church to special prayer that there may be an awakened thoughtfulness and willingness to respond to this great need.

Seventy-five men were preparing for the ministry at five of our institutions last year. Twenty-four of them were under the care of the Board. Nine of them completed their collegiate and theological course of study at three of the institutions. The data from the other schools could not be obtained, and the reports from all the institutions for this year have not yet been obtained. Fraternally yours,

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Rules of Order for the Government of North Carolina Conference.

- 1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's Annual Report.
- 2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.
- 3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.
- 4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of the Scripture and prayer, under the direction of the President.
- 5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.
- 6. It shall be the duty of the Chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflections or irrelevant debate.
- 7. The Chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.
- 8. All the committees shall be appointed by the Chair, unless otherwise ordered by the Conference.
- 9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
 - 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.
- 11. No member shall speak ou any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the Chair.
- 12. No member shall be permitted to speak more than once on any question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.
- 13. No person shall pass between the Chair and a member while speaking, nor interrupt the speaker, except by permission to explain.
- 14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud to disturb the Conference.
- 15. Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.
- 16. Members are required to vote in all cases, except excused therefrom by the Conference.
- 17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.
- 18. All motious and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay ou the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.
- 19. All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on the main question.
- 20. All questions of order arising after the previous question has been called for shall be decided without debate.

- 21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The year and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.
 - 22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.
- 23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- 24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be called up again during the session.
- 25. No person shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.
 - 26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.
- 27. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.

PROCEEDINGS.

The Seventy-Ninth Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church met in Burlington Methodist Protestant Church, Burlington, North Carolina, November 24th, 1904, at 10 o'clock a.m. Religious exercises were conducted by the President, Rev. T. M. Johnson.

The roll was then called.

The President then read his annual report, as follows:

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the North Carolina Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, Burlington, N. C., November 24, 1904:

Dear Brethren—Another twelve months brings us to the seventyninth session of our Conference. Since we last met one of our members, Dr. T. T. Ferree, has passed away. A committee on obituary
has been appointed and will report at the proper time. There are
three other facts, each of which has brought great sorrow to the
heart of a member of our body, which I think should be mentioned
here and listened to in a spirit of brotherly sympathy—the death of
the wife of Bro. J. H. Totten, and the death of the wife of Bro. A. G.
Dixon, and the failure of the health of the wife of Bro. J. W. Frank,
necessitating her return to this country, while Bro. Frank remains at
his work in Japan, and subsequently the death of their first born in
Greensboro while Bro. Frank still remains in Japan. The heartthrobs of sorrow in our brother's breast should find a responsive
chord in our own.

RELEASED AND APPOINTED.

About one month after Conference Rev. J. G. W. Halloway was released from the Davidson Circuit and assigned as pastor of the Proximity-Revolution work; and Rev. Jas. A. Ledbetter was assigned to Davidson as pastor. When the year was about one-third out Rev. P. C. Battle asked to be released from the pastorate of the Mecklenburg Circuit, which request was granted. About the beginning of the school vacation for the summer Rev. C. A. Swift was assigned to that field as pastor. Soon after the adjournment of the last Conference, by the agreement of all parties concerned, Rev. A. N. Brown took charge of Moser's Chapel, Poplar Springs, Hills Grove, of the Surry Circuit, leaving Rev. J. L. Giles, the pastor appointed by the last Conference, of this field, in charge of Stony Knoll, Union Hill, and Baltimore. When the year was about one-half out Bro. Giles, by his request, was released from the pastorate of the three churches named. As no satisfactory arrangement for a pastor could be made these three churches remained without a pastor. Recently, however, Bro. Chas. Hauser has been preaching for some or all of these churches without any formal appointment as pastor. The Boundary Committee should consider whether or not some changes in boundaries would enable these two fields, Mecklenburg and Surry, to be better cared for.

LETTER GIVEN.

About the first of the present month Rev. P. C. Battle, by his request, was given a letter of his standing in the Conference.

THREE THINGS URGED.

During the year I have urged three things, namely, that churches and Circuits get themselves into the habit of paying every cent of every claim for general interests, that they also get themselves into the habit of paying pastor's salary quarterly or monthly, and that our people take and read our church papers. It is the laity that I have urged, but the accomplishing of these things is largely with the pastors. I have for the two years endeavored to start a movement to get fields asking for a change of pastor to bear the moving expenses of the man who comes to serve them. If the pastors want this it is theirs to work out. I now turn it over to them to do with as they will.

GOOD REVIVALS.

This seems to have been a good year for revivals, notwithstanding the plentifulness of material things, and notwithstanding the fact that it is a "political year." Churches have been revived, men and women have been saved, and I think reports will show a healthful growth.

FINANCIAL REPORTS.

When all reports are summed up, I think they will make a good showing, financially, as compared with what we have done other years, but not good, I think, as compared with what we can and should do, and what I believe we shall do when our people have been thoroughly taught concerning their fuancial obligations and trained in the contributing of their means to the extending of the Kingdom. I therefore recommend that pustors instruct their people concerning this great duty and privilege, giving them the Bible teaching on the subject. Men do not want to hear an off repeated harangue from the pulpit about money, but I am persuaded they will hear willingly the Bible teaching on any subject not excepting that of money and its uses. I further recommend that pastors read "The Pocketbook Opener" by Dr. J. F. Cowan, also the "Pew to the Pulpit," by Thos. Kane, 310 Asheland Ave., Chicago, Ill., and that they distribute among their people literature on the subject. For this use "Some Questions and Answers About Christian Giving," by a Layman, 310 Asheland Ave., Chicago, 111., is goo; also "What We Owe, from a Lawyer's Standpoint," by J. P. Ho'son, Elizabethtown, Ky.

CHURCH BUILDING.

During the past year there has been, I think, unusual activity in church building. Asheville and other points afford excellent opportunities to do yet other building. Men and money are the lacks, especially money. The Board of Church Extension is pressed almost every month in the year to make payments on appropriation already

voted and urged to vote other appropriations. Much of the time they cannot pay because they have no money, and cannot make appropriations because there is no prospect of getting money sufficient. In not a few instances those who are turned empty handed away from the Board's empty treasury go direct to the people for the money needed in building. There exists the same prejudice against Church Extension, yet the people are willing to contribute toward the building of a church. From this it would seem that the Board of Church Extension would do well to keep its work and its needs and the opportunities before the people. Let it not be an indefinite thing, called "Church Extension" to which the people are asked to contribute, but let it be something definite-let the people know where the churches are that are being built and what sort of building each is and any other facts that will in the minds of the people tend to bring this great work out of the maze and haze of indefiniteness and make it definite and visible. This may be done in part by having men who are building at new points visit the near-by fields and present to the people the needs and opportunities of the churches they are building, also in some instances by letters issued by officers of the Board. I recommend to the Board that it use some such methods or something better that the members of the Board may devise. Before leaving this part of my report I must again refer to Asheville and our opportunity there. The Board of Home Missions now offers to help start a work in Asheville; it seems, that it is now possible for us to take up that work.

CHURCH PAPERS.

Evidently one of the great factors in extending God's kingdom is the press, especially the religious press. One of the forces of no little importance in extending our own cause in North Carolina is Our Church Record. I am persuaded that it would require several vears yet for us to reach our present stage of advancement had we continued without this additional help. Yet I am persuaded that helpful as has been this paper to our cause we may now make it much more helpful. To do this two things are necessary; the paper must be improved and the circulation increased. I still hear the complaints: "The paper is too small," "There is not enough orginal matter," "We want to hear more about the general interests and the different enterprises in which our church is interested." I therefore recommend that the Conference take such steps as will bring the needed improvements. I also recommend that more attention be given the circulation among our people of one or both of our general organs, The Methodist Protestant, and The Methodist Recorder. We make a great mistake if we allow our local paper to crowd out the general organs.

EDUCATION.

Our college enterprise seems to be gaining strength and confidence. The committee, driven by local changes to sell the first site purchased, has selected another that is thought by some to offer some advantages the other did not. The matter of purchasing a site, as well as the matter of selling the other site, has been handled with great care by some of the best business talent. This movement should have the interest and co-operation of all our people.

MINUTES.

The Conference Minutes should be placed into the hands of the people sooner after the adjournment of Conference. I have asked Rev. R. M. Andrews to get estimates of the cost of printing the minutes from various printers and thus facilitate the getting out of the minutes. I recommend that the Conference at the proper time hear his report and unless something better is offered that the Conference endorse his work and authorize him to proceed as soon as the matter can be placed into his hands to have the minutes printed.

EXPENSE OF DIAMOND JUBILEE.

I recommend that this Conference provide for meeting the expenses of issuing Diamond Jubilee program.

SUPERANNUATES.

It is our duty—we should think of it as a pleasant privilege—to take care of our worn out ministers and their families. We should make our fund larger, that the appropriations in at least some instances may be larger.

PLAN FOR PRESIDENT'S WORK.

After two years in the office I am thoroughly convinced that it is a mistake to have the President of the Conference visit every field. Not that it is too laborious for the man, not that the three hundred and sixty-five days do not afford enough time for him to do this, but he can serve the cause better in another way. He should visit the weaker and undeveloped fields, perhaps, in some instances, more than once during the year, and when necessary, remain longer than he can when he must cover the entire district. With the present plan he touches each field once during the year, in some instances too early in the year, in others too late, to really accomplish much, while he should be in touch with all the fields all the year. This can be done only by allowing the President to lead in a correspondence with certain representative members of all the churches on all the fields. He should travel less and correspond more, also use the press more. He should spend approximately as much money for postage and printing, to-

gether with what traveling he would do, as he now spends traveling. But it has come to me that it is feared by some that the President would not give full time to the work unless he is required to spend practically all the time traveling. As this objection to a change has been raised, I understand, while I have been in the office, I feel free to notice it, and would meet the objection by suggesting that you put a man in the office that works in the pastorate and he will work in this office, whether the plan compels him to or not. A man that does not work in the pastorate beyond what he is compelled, will not, of course, work in the office of President beyond what the plan compels him. However, it is not my purpose to recommend any change in the plan for President's work, since the sentiment is so decided against it. This will probably be a work for the next generation to do.

MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE.

Our last Conference memoralized the General Conference "to point out the law and the process by which the mandate, 'No member shall be expelled or deprived of church privileges, without an impartial trial,' Section 3, Article 14, page 35, of the Constitution, is to be made operative." (See page 23 of last year's minutes).

The General Conference, through its Committee on Judiciary, answers: "After a full investigation of the matter your Committee would answer that the only way to make the law quoted effective is for the accused to avail himself of all the privileges and rights granted him by the Constitution and Discipline, and to secure thereby an impartial trial." (See Report 1, page 94, of Journal of General Conference, 1904).

BOUNDARY OF SOUTH CAROLINA TERRITORY.

Section 4, Report C, (Committee on Boundaries), page 73 of Journal of General Conference, so changes boundaries as to add to the North Carolina Conference Chesterfield, Anderson, and Yarborough's Station, formerly of the South Carolina Conference.

REPORT BLANKS.

I recommend that we adopt the report blank recommended by the General Conference for Statistical Report. The blanks for other reports are so radically different from our methods of reporting that they seem entirely unsuited to our needs, therefore, I recommend that we do not adopt these. (See page 1244, of Journal).

MINUTES TO BE SENT SECRETARY OF GENERAL CONFERENCE.

The General Conference requests that the Secretary of each Annual Conference send promptly a copy of minutes of Annual Conference to the Secretary of the General Conference, according to law. The President of the General Conference also suggests that a copy should be sent to the President of the General Conference. I recommend that the Conference instruct the Secretary to send these copies to the officers of the General Conference as soon as the minutes are published.

UNION WITH PRIMITIVE METHODISTS.

We, as a Conference, are called upon to give a yes or no expression regarding the proposed union between the Primitive Methodist and the Methodist Protestant churches. The following is the basis of the proposed union:

- 1. The adoption of all that is in common in the books of Discipline.
- 2. Equal representation in all the courts of the church as in the Methodist Protestant church.
- 3. The system of appointing pastors and supplying churches as in the Primitive Methodist church, with the understanding that the General Conference of the united body may grant to the Annual Conferences the right to use other methods if they so desire.
- 4. The amalgamation of the interests and funds under separate neads, such as Foreign Missionary. Home Missionary, Church Extension, Educational and Superannuation, on equal basis. The conduct and government of such to be provided for by the first Conference or Convention of the united body.
- 5. That all ministers and members of the new church stand as in their own, previous to the union.
- 6. The selection of a name for the united church to be left to the first Conference or Convention of the united body.
- 7. That this basis be laid before the Annual Conferences for a yes or no expression, and provided a two-thirds majority vote favorable to the union, the President of each General Conference is thereby authorized to call a special session of his General Conference, if necessary, for the purpose of consumating the union. (See pages 127-8 of Journal.)

METHODIST PROTESTANT, CONGREGATIONALISTS, UNITED BRETHREN.

Our last General Conference acted favorably upon the proposed union between the three denominations here named, adopting the report of the Committee on Church Union, from which the following extract is taken:

"According to the Syllabus we recommend: First, that the sugges-

tion for a General Council on Joint Commission be adopted by this General Conference, and that such a General Council be ordered for the purpose of exchanging views, discussing conditions and principles involved, and formulating such a basis of union as may be agreed upon and submitted to their respective constituent bodies to be approved.

"We recommend that one such Commissioner be elected by each Annual Conference at its next session following the adjournment of this General Conference." (See page 126 of Journal).

This Conference should elect this Commissioner.

MEMBER OF BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

It is made our duty as a Conference to elect at this session one member of the Board of Foreign Missions to serve four years. (See Section 1, Report F, page 75 of Journal).

DATE OF CONFERENCE.

The following resolution was adopted by our last General Conference:

"Resolved, That the General Conference request the Presidents of the Annual Conferences, whose dates conflict, to take measures looking to a mutual agreement, whereby the time of holding Annual Conferences may be so adjusted that the general agents of the church may be enabled to visit as many Conferences as possible, and thereby render their services to the church more effective." (See page 44 of Journal). I hereby place this matter before the North Carolina Conference for its action.

DISCIPLINE JUDICIARY.

During the month of August a printed postal was received from Daniel B. Turney, President of the South Illinois Annual Conference, desiring me, as President of the North Carolina Annual Conference, to join with other presidents in carling for the Discipline Judiciary 'to test the constitutionality of the act of the General Conference concerning the change of Paris Station from South Illinois Conference to the North Illinois Conference.' I refer the matter to this body for such action as it may deem wise to take.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DIVORCE REFORM.

Whereas, The statistics show that in North Carolina during the past year there have been granted by the courts of the State more than 1,400 divorces; and

Whereas, Every divorce grantd in the State for any cause other than those causes prescribed in the Code of North Carolina in the edition of 1883, is a blow at the purity of our social life and the sanctity of the marriage relation; and

Whereas, The General Assembly of North Carolina has within recent years increased the number of causes for which divorce may be granted, and has rendered more easy the procurement of such separa-

tion; and

Whereas It is demonstrated by experience that legislation which encourages and thereby multiplies suits for divorce weakens in the minds of the people a just sense of sanctity of marriage and undermines social and domestic purity, and dishonors the best traditions of church and state; now, therefore, be it by the North Carolina Annual Conference

Resolved, 1. That we do view with alarm the attack upon the social and domestic virtue that is being made by the ever-increasing

number of statutory causes for divorce in North Carolina;

2. That as a church organization we are opposed to granting divorces for any causes other than those prescribed in the Code of 1883.

3. That a committee be appointed by this Conference to prepare and publish in the Church Record, and the secular papers of our State, an address upon this subject and to co-operate as far as possible with like committees appointed by other church organizations for the securement of the same object; also to prepare a memorial to the General Assembly of North Carolina urging such legislation as may be necessary to restore our divorce laws to their original simplicity.

We herewith submit correspondence from Bishop Cheshire of the Protestant Episcopal Church, for the use of the committee to be

appointed as herein proposed.

When Sunday Schools were first instituted that name was, perhaps, the most appropriate to be given to the work done. charge instruction on Sunday School methods.

Resolved, 2. That this Conference, as soon as it can find a person that can be secured to do the work, employ that one to make a specialty of Sunday School work, to organize where they are needed, to hold Sunday School Institutes, Conventions, and other Sunday School gatherings, and endeavor to lay on the hearts and consciences of the people the importance of this great work.

Report No. 9.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LITERATURE.

1. Our church papers have been commended from time to time, until this seems to be needless, further than to emphasize the fact that it is utterly impossible for a person to be an intelligent Methodist Protestant without reading one or more of our church organs, viz: The Methodist Protestant. The Methodist Recorder, or Our Church Record. That other things being equal, it is impossible for one to be as useful to his church without, as with, his church paper. One without his church paper, in church affairs, is much like the person thirty or forty miles from the railroad, without the newspaper, is in state and national affairs.

2. We would call attention to our own literature in the form of books and pamphlets, such as the "M. P. Discipline," "History of Methodist Reform," by Dr. Drinkhouse, "The Contrast," and "Water Baptism," by Dr. L. W. Bates, and "M. P. Principles," by Dr. Lewis. Perhaps our pastors do not give enough attention to the circulation of these, and similar denominational books and brochures. We find in some sections that our people know almost nothing about the laws, and underlying principles of our church, or of the cause

which led to its origin.

3. We believe that our pastors may do much good by acting colporteur—selling evangelical books, distributing tracts and pamphlets, especially among the young. Many souls in other days, were brought to Christ in this way. This is a reading age, and if our young people do not read something good they will read something bad; and it seems to belong to the province of the pastor to help in the furnishing of something good.

4. The devil is flooding the country, not only with all kinds of

4. The devil is flooding the country, not only with all kinds of trash, as reading matter, but also that which is positively vile, per-nicious, skeptical—contaminating and misleading in many ways; so

that it is important that the pastor keep a sharp lookout in this direction, lest the devil damage his flock through this medium. Not that the pastor is to act as censor, but as adivsor, admonisher, enlightener to look out for the vile, insidious, skeptical, and show it up in its true character, by unraveling its sophistries, tearing off the veneering, etc., that the people may see and know its truly diabolical nature.

We would recommend that great care be exercised in the selection for our Sunday School libraries. We have found books in Sunday School libraries that scarcely ought to be anywhere, and some that ought to be nowhere. All the books in the Sunday School libraries should be high-toned and evangelical.

6. We cannot close this report without calling attention to the fearfully damaging effects of the Sunday paper, leading to Sabbath desecration, non-church-going, non-bible reading, etc., etc. It is the sense of this committee that our pastors should discourage the Sunday paper.

Report No. 13.

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

We rejoice in the encouraging and improving conditions of our work in Japan which despite the demoralization incident to the Russo-Japanese war is more promising than ever before. The workers are united and hopeful. The Japenese mind is reported more open to the Gospel and the field is whitening unto the harvest. The only real discouragement is the want of men and means to successfully prosecute the work already undertaken and to improve the increasing opportunities providentially opened. Great and effectual doors stand open wide and un-entered, and communities of millions of souls cry in vain, "Come over and help us." Our missionaries are sick at heart over their inability to answer the urgent calls and are looking to God and the church for relief. The last year and quadrenium reported the largest receipts ever turned in for the church from the general shurch and our Conference; yet, so great have been the needs of the growth of the work exceeds the increase of receipts and calls for everincreasing liberality in the work's support.

We recommend the insertion in this report the following statistics of our foreign missionary work: Preachers, 27; charges, 20; appointments, 33; organized churches, 10; members, 800; Sunday Schools, 32; scholars, 1,387; a college and a night school, with 12 teachers, and 473 students enrolled last year; 2,500 public religious services were held and 1.175 Sunday school sessions, with an average attendance of 35; 5,340 visits were made to homes, and 1,160 visits were received from inquirers: 111 were baptized, and 129 received into the church. There are 8 church buildings and 3 parsonages, worth \$9,390, and a college and a night school building, worth \$30,000, with no indebtedness. Resident members contributed \$1,20 each last year. The

churches at home gave \$20,075.15, and the Board disbursed \$21,095.23,

88 3-5 per cent. of it in the foreign work.

Your committee would also commend to the sympathies of this Conference and of our people generally our missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Frank, recently so sadly bereaved in the death of their eldest child, Charles Frank, and we would solicit prayers for the comforting grace in this their trying hour. Brother Frank is in Japan and his wife is here, at home, in poor health.

We recommend the apportionment to the various charges of the North Carolina Conference of the \$1,900 assessed to the same by the Board of Foreign Missions upon the same basis as that of the Home

Mission assessment.

We recommend to our pastors the use of the proxy plan as suggested by Secretary-Treasurer Ogburn, by which churches, Sunday schools and individual members assume the support of a worker or chapel in the mission field a certain length of time, the money thus raised to be credited on the assessment unless otherwise directed by the donors.

We are gratified at the increasing success of our Home Mission work under the direction of our efficient Secretary and Treasurer, Dr.

MacManiman.

We would commend our Church Extension Board for its discreet

management of the funds intrusted to its care.

We therefore emphasize the importance of all these interests as they are so clearly identified that the success of the one means the success of all. We would urge the pastors to use their best endeavors to secure the whole amounts assessed to their respective charges for these various interests.

Report No. 15.

REPORT ON COLLEGES.

"Education" is the watch-word in North Carolina at present, and it ought to be. Our State is moving forward along all industrial lines, and this is due largely to the increased interest in education. Education is one of the chief requisites to progress. What is true of the State is true of that part of the State represented by the Methodist Protestant church. We therefore urge upon Methodist Protestants to grasp every opportunity to educate. In our church, where each individual is supposed to think and act for himself, it becomes necessary We commend Oak Ridge Institute, Yadkin Hiph School, and Liberty Normal College, all of which are under the efficient management of our own people, to the youth of our church; and we thoroughly appreciate the work these institutions have already done for the Methodist Protestant church.

Western Maryland College, Adrian College, and Kansas City University are doing excellent work and their doors are open to our young men and young women who are ready for college. We have at present two ministerial students who are in the graduating class at Western Maryland College.

We especially recommend Westminster Theological Seminary to our young men who are looking toward the ministry, and we report that the Seminary has passed through the most successful year of the present administration, and that the present year has opened with the largest enrollment in the history of the institution.

We lament the dearth of young men entering the ministry and urge upon our pastors the need of explaining the nature of the call to

the ministry to any Godly and intelligent young men on their charges.

We urge that earnest effort be made to raise the Seminary assessment. That pastors send to the president of the Seminary the names of any young men on their charges whom they believe called to preach. That all our Circuits set apart for special prayer the month of May and our Stations set apart the second Sunday in May as a day of proyer that young men may be called into the ministry.

We recommend that, when a field agent is sent out in the interest of our College Enterprise here in North Carolina, the pastors of all our charges co-operate with him in every particular so as to make his

work a success. No man can succeed alone.

We recommend that an Educational Conference of Methodist Protestants be held in the early fall of 1905, the time, place, and pro-

gram to be arranged by the Educational Board.

We recommend that this Conference, by a rising vote, express to Rev. J. F. McCulloch its appreciation and gratitude for his untiring efforts in the interest of our College Enterprise, and for his self-sacrifice to that end, and when he can see his way clear to do so, we recommend that he be requested to return to North Carolina to aid in this work.

PASTORAL WORK.

The duties of a pastor are plainly marked out in our Constitution and Discipline and in the New Testament. He will encourage them and comfort them in sickness and in sorrow. He will admonish kindly those who are not living up to their professions as Christians. will also visit those who have no pastoral oversight outside the membership of his own charge. He will do them all kindness possible and will endeavor to lead them to confess Christ. He will be ready for every good word and work. He will be instant-in accident, in calamity, in disappointment, in misfortune, in sickness, in bereavement.

If we cannot cross the ocean, on our mission of comfort and evangelization, we can visit the neglected at home. By doing this every pastor may practice and push Church Extension, may carry on Home Mission work, and may be a Foreign missionary, not simply in spirit, but actually practice the life of a foreign missionary.

The pastor who is not willing to do pastoral work blocks the kingdom against success, robs the people of the helpfulness he owes them, violates his sacred obligation as a minister, and denies to him-

self a source of great power and inspiration.

A baptism of the pastoral spirit would bring our church to success by leaps and bounds.

Report No. 17.

REPORT ON FINANCE.

A conviction of the fact that our church is not measuring up to its opportunities or its responsibilities in the matter of giving of our

substance to the Lord, prompts us to say the following:

1. We recognize the need of systematic giving. It is certain that God would not and most assuredly did not establish his church on earth without making ample provision for its support. In the beginning God instituted a system of tithes for the express purpose of maintaining divine worship. Abraham paid tithes, so did Jacob, and it is fair to presume that all the patriarchs did. God, through Malachi, denounced the Jews for not giving their tithes. They were prosperous when they paid them, and adversity was certain when they did not. "He who brings to the Lord less than a tithe, curtails to this extent the Lord's work, and he who diligently earns money in business and systematically sustains the work with the tenth of the increase as truly preaches the gospel as the foreign missionary."

2. Have a plan and work the plan. No plan, however good, can work itself. Let the motto be "Eevery cent for every assessment at every point." The stewards should take the church register and apportion to each member the amount they should give to all interests and send or hand it to them for their approval. This develops the habit of giving unto the Lord into a steady self-acting principle. It makes giving a spontaneous, thoughtful, cheerful duty. By this plan we reach the masses. The contributions may be small, but drops, though small in themselves, make the mighty rivers and flowing

oceans, and the oceans water the world.

We believe when a collection is taken for any interest, and that interest is overpaid, that the overplus should be applied to some other interest till all interests are paid. This rule should apply to the pastor as well as to other interests.

Have a church treasurer and let him disburse the money and make a

full report to the church.

3. All general agents should be satisfied with the full assessment. No church should be satisfied with less than the full assessment. No interest in the church should prosper at the expense of another.

4. We recommend greater care in the selection of stewards, believing that when the finances of our church are placed in the hands of intelligent, consecrated, business men the greater part of the financial trouble will have been eliminated from our church work. If the steward fails to discharge his duties the cause of God will inevitably suffer.

We recommend the blank handed the pastors last year for individual apportionment as a most excellent plan.

MEMORS OF REV. T. T. FERREE, M. D.

(Read by Rev. W. A. Bunch before the recent Annual Conference in Burlington, November 27, 1904, and published by order of the Con-

ference).

Church Extension

Rev. T. T. Ferree, M. D., was born near Cedar Falls, Randolph County. North Carolina, May 5th, 1852. When but a small loy he made a profession of faith in Christ, and joined the Methodist Protestant Church at Giles' Chapel, under the ministry of Rev. W. C. Hammer. From that time forward he took an active part in the work of the church, always willing to perform any duty imposed upon him by the church. Like most boys of limited means in the rural districts, the opportunity for an early education in his day was in a great measure wanting, but having made proper use of the opportunity then offered he proved himself to be by no means a novice. Having been reared on the farm and being thoroughly acquainted with life's duties and struggles, he was well equipped in practical knowledge for all life's duties, and did not have to lean entirely upon books and the thoughts of other men, but was possessed of a well-balanced mind.

He was at about the age of seventeen years licensed to exhort, and but a year or more later was licensed to preach, and as a local preacher was very zealous and effective. In 1872, when only in his twentieth year, was employed by Dr. A. W. Lineberry, president of the North Carolina Annual Conference, to supply Monroe Mission. This work, in its then disorganized condition, was in nowise inspiring to

the young itinerant, but his zeal for the cause, together with his unfailing faith in God saved him from the discouragement which so frequently embarrass the young itinerant under similar circumstances. After completing the year, or part of the year, on Monroe, he did not join the Conference, nor accept work therefrom, but was in May of the following year, 1873, employed by Rev. R. H. Wills, then president of the Conference, to supply Catawba Circuit. entered the Conference as an itinerant at the session held in Friendship church, Davidson County, N. C., and was at that session, December the 7th, 1873, ordained deacon.

He received his first appointment from the Conference to the Catawba work, now embraced in the Cleveland, Lincoln, and Concord Circuits, where he served during the years of 1874-'75. more congenial charge, which greatly inspired the youthful itinerant, and a work was accomplished, not only widespread in its incipience, out also of such a permanent character that the experimental test of the past became permanent and fixed for the future, and the church has so flourished in that section that the territory then occupied, now

embraces four pastoral charges.

He was ordained elder at the session of the Conference held in Union Chapel Church, Granville (now Vance) County, N. C., December 5th, 1875, and his name enrolled a member of the Conference,

which relation was severed only by death.

He was at that session assigned to the pastorate of Guilford Circuit, which he served for 1876-777. The influences for good then set in motion have been widening and deepening as the years have gone by. So intimate had the relations of pastor and people become that the desire for his return for the third year was practically unanimous. But he having entered the ministry and itinerancy so young his cshooling had not been purused to that degree which he desired, therefore he declined an appointment from the Conference of 1877 and spent the following year in school at Yadkin College.

Returning to work at the Conference of 1888 he was given pastoral

charge of Winston Circuit, in which capacity he served for 1879, 1880,

1881, 1882.

He was paster of Granville Circuit 1883-'84, and during those years, in connection with his constant pastoral duties, he succeeded

in building the parsonage in the town of Kittrell, N. C.

He was appointed pastor of Mocksville Circuit at the Conference of 1884, and served in that capacity until October, 1885. His untiring devotion to the cause of humanity and the church had far exceeded his physical strength, and under the strain of the years above mentioned he had contracted clergyman's sore throat.

In this condition he was forced to the conclusion that it was a question of a short time only when he would be compelled to retire from the itinerancy and active ministry, consequently we find him r tiring from Mocksville in October, 1885, to pursue his studies in the

medical college.

After this date, though remaining a member of the Conference, he served in the itinerancy only three years, he was appointed to and served as Conference Evangelist in 1892, was elected and served as president of the Conference in 1894 and 1895. He retired from the laborious and responsible duties of this office at the Greensboro Conference, November 22, 1895, with his health very much impaired, from which it is more than problematical that he never fully recovered.

In the sixteen years of itinerancy above mentioned was crowded the work of an ordinary lifetime. Dr. Ferree came to the work of the itinerancy at the period where the enthusiasm of youth and the strength of manhood converge. No wonder that he won for himself the honorable distinction of one of the most persistent and untiring workers which the Conference had commissioned. But few men have ever entered the itinerancy with greater zeal for the cause, a more perfect consecration, or a firmer reliance upon the Divine interpreta-

tion in the development of human character.

This zeal, consecration and devotion was not barren, nor was its swestness wasted on the desert air, but wonderful results were the fruits which it brought forth. In many charges which he served great awakenings were the result of his preaching, the church was made to feel the mighty power of the Christian's God, and sinners were shaken from their false foundation. Hundreds, perhaps thousands, can point to him as the human agent under Divine guidance who was able to successfully point them to the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world. But in all his labors, trials, and conflicts he knew that he was serving the Omnipotent, who has said: "They that he wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars forever and ever."

It was as a member of the local church where, perhaps, his Christian graces, and Christian manhood shone the brightest, where he was ever zealous for the welfare of his church and denomination, and ever ready to back his zeal and devotion with his material substance.

In his last illness he lingered for quite a while, and fell on sleep in Jesus Sunday morning, March 20, 1904. His remains were taken to High Point, N. C., where appropriate services were held in North Main Street Methodist Protestant Church and interment in the High Point cemetery, March 21st, 1904.

His firm faith in God which had sustained him in life proved his

anchorage in death.



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RULES OF ORDER FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

- I. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's Annual Report.
- 2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.
- 3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.
- 4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of the Scripture and prayer, under the direction of the President.
- 5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.
- 6. It shall be the duty of the Chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflections or irrelevant debate.
- 7. The Chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.
- 8. All the committees shall be appointed by the Chair, unless otherwise ordered by the Conference.
- 9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
- 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.
- II. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the Chair.
- 12. No member shall be permitted to speak more than once on any question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.
- 13. No person shall pass between the Chair and a member while speaking, nor interrupt the speaker, except by permission to explain.
- 14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud to disturb the Conference.
- 15. Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.
- 16. Members are required to vote in all cases, except excused therefrom by the Conference.
- 17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.
- 18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.
- 19. All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on the main question.
- 20. All questions of order arising after the previous question has been called for shall be decided without debate.
- 21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.

- 22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.
- 23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- 24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be called up again during the session.
- 25. No person shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.
 - 26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.
- 27. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.

The President read his annual report:

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, High Point, N. C., Nov. 23, 1905.

Dear Brethren: Another year has passed and we now meet in the eightieth session of our Conference. During the year one of our members—Bro. J. H. Totten—has passed away. A committee on obituary has been appointed, and will report at such time as the Conference may designate to hold the usual memorial service. In this connection I call attention to the death of the wife of one of our number, Bro. W. A. Bunch, to whom the sympathy of each member of this Conference should extend. Others of our number have had great sorrow to come into their homes and lives by sickness and death. Following a recently established custom, I do not particularize further than to call attention to the death of a member or a mem-

ber's wife; but when the heart of any member of the Conference is made sad the heart of every other member should sympathize with him.

Appointed. As soon as practical after the adjournment of the last session pastors were appointed to the four unsupplied fields as follows: Albemarle, Rev. J. H. Totten; Chatham, Rev. J. L. Giles; Rockingham, Rev. H. W. Braswell; Saxapahaw, Rev. W. W. Amick. The Committee on Divorce Reform was appointed and published in minutes; also the chairmen of sub-districts and the superintendents of Christian Endeavor. The three committees authorized by the last Conference were appointed and published in our Church Record of April 20th, as follows: To Revise Conference Course, Revs. W. A. Bunch, C. L. Whitaker, R. M. Andrews. To Prepare Blank for Official Character, Revs. C. A. Cecil, H. S. B. Thompson. To Prepare Pledge for Beneficiaries, Revs. A. G. Dixon, W. F. Kennett, C. E. M. Raper.

Made Vacant. The Albemarle pastorate was made vacant by the death of Rev. J. H. Totten, and that of Plymouth and Edenton by the resignation of Rev. C. A. Swift that he might enter school. After some correspondence with leading members on each field it was decided to leave both fields without a pastor until Conference should supply them at this session.

Certificate Granted. About the first of November Rev. R. L. Melton asked for and was granted a certificate of his standing, and has since, I am told, joined another church, hence his name should be erased from our roll.

Churches: Coming, Going. During the year a church at King's Mountain and its pastor, Rev. J. B. Parham, came to us from the Free Will Baptist church. While it is not a strong church it is capable of doing good, hence should be cared for by the Boundary Committee, and the pastor by the Board of Examiners.

Three of the churches on the Rockingham circuit were reported to me as having gone to the Fire Baptized Holiness church with one Rev. Bryant Lovin, who though not a voting member of our Conference, had served Rockingham as pastor. On enquiry I was told that the man and the churches had, in name, come to us a few years ago from the denomination to which they have now gone. No title conveying the property to us had been made. It seems they were drifting and lodged for a short time against one corner of our church, then drifted again. Montpelier, Nebo and Spring Hill are the churches of which the Boundary Committee should make note.

Revivals. This has been a year of great extremes in revivals. While in some instances the revivals have been only ordinary, in other instances they have been extraordinary. The most noteworthy

is that in the Winston church, continuing for more than five weeks and numbering nearly three hundred conversions. One fact: For a year or more preceding this great revival there has been unusual interest and activity among the members and by the pastor, in the material improvement of the property and in the finances of the church. The same activity may be noted preceding the unusual revival at Worthville. The revivals at Fairview, Gibsonville Circuit and at Lebanon, on the Lebanon Circuit, are worthy of note, and possibly others.

Church Music. Some of our churches have good music, some have ordinary, and perhaps in some instances it can hardly be called ordinary. I think as a rule where the Methodist Protestant Hymnal is used the church music is better. Music has been and is a great factor in revival work and in the extending of the kingdom. I recommend that this Conference encourage the use of our Hymnal, and encourage pastors and churches to provide for their people suitable instruction in suitable music for church services, and especially that this instruction look to the learning by our people of the unused music in our Hymnal, of which there is much and of good quality.

Men and the Ministry. The lack of enough efficient acceptable men in the ministry has often been remarked and lamented, and sometimes has discouraged us. It may tend to relieve our discouragement to turn our thought to the fact that this lack of efficiency and of a sufficiency is not alone in church work and the ministry. Persons who want to hire a cook or a servant for household work have a similar or even greater difficulty. Much farm land is lying uncultivated for lack of farm hands. Cotton manufacturers find it difficult to get sufficient help. Sometimes a school is taught by an inferior teacher for lack of an efficient one; families reluctantly call second or even a third rate doctor because a first rate one is not available.

But acceptable men in the ministry are scarce and how to deal with this fact is the problem before us. That we may have a larger development we need to make new fields. Some of our fields will ask of this Conference to be divided. The difficulty in doing this will be the supplying of the larger number of fields with pastors. As to how we are to have sufficient of acceptable men to meet the demand, I recommend as follows: First, that we use the men we have, and that we do not lay them on the shelf because some years have passed over their heads. We need to correct the sentiment that so soon as a man has had some years' experience he is too old to take work. Let the field take as pastor the best avaliable man and then be as faithful in co-operating with him as they are now urgent that they have a young man. Then, too, the man of years should exert himself to conform to modern methods and to meet modern demands. Second, that we again pray and that we pray

without ceasing the Lord of the harvest that He send forth laborers into the harvest. In the past we have made this a special object of prayer at stated times, and now we have a number of promising young men in the schools preparing for the ministry—five at Westminster Theological Seminary, one at Yadkin College High School, one at Whitsett Institute, two at Elon College, and two on Orange Circuit, and perhaps others. It is not presumption, but an act of faith to think of this as an answer to our prayers, and at least some of our pastors showed their faith by their works in preaching on the call to the ministry. I recommend that the second Sunday in May be Ministerial Sunday and that the week preceding be Ministerial Week, and that we pray at that time in the public congregation, in the prayer meeting, in the Sunday-School, in the family worship, in our private devotion, and without ceasing for more men in the ministry, and that each pastor preach to each of his congregations during May on the call to the ministry.

Church Business Affairs. It is time we had already learned that promptness in meeting claims when due, system and business methods are as essential to success in church affairs as in any business enterprise. Pastors and stewards should know these things to do them. It is incumbent on pastors to show the people their financial duty from a Bible point of view. The Bible will aid in doing this. There are also leaflets published by a layman, Chicago, that will give further aid. These are still in print and I think can be gotten, though I failed after earnest effort to get them last year to place into the hands of pastors for distribution among their people. The financial problem is a great problem for us to solve and very important; but with what I have already said I leave it with the Committee on Ways and Means, except that I will add that I am convinced that we should pay our pastors monthly and that our leading churches should take the lead in this.

Pastors' Salaries. That there should be a general increase in pastors' salaries almost goes without saying. It is almost true that it requires more money than formerly for everything except to pay the preacher, and that everybody gets more money than formerly except the preacher. It becomes a necessity that the preacher divide his time, his thought, his energy between his appointed work and the support of his family. "It is not reason that he should leave the word of God and serve tables." The support of his family should be provided for, that he may give himself "continually to prayer and the ministry of the word." It is possible that the scarcity of men in the ministry is due in part to the meager or insufficient support the church offers. Not that men are preaching for money, but it is reasonable that when a man gives his services to the church he may reasonably expect of the church a support for himself and family; not such a support as will enable him to fare sumptuously every day

but such a support as will afford the necessities and at least some of the comforts of life. It is a hopeful indication that some of our laymen are interesting themselves and agitating the matter. It is to be hoped that our laymen will take hold of this thing to do it. I recommend that the Conference take action encouraging the matter.

Church Extension. The naming of March for Church Extension month and the sending out, by the Board, of facts concerning the work, the opportunities, and the needs have brought results at least somewhat gratifying. This has put money into the treasury earlier in the year and, it seems at this writing, more money for the entire year. However, the officers of the Board informed me that a number of pastors failed to furnish the name of a layman at each church as required by last Conference, to aid in this work. Conference will do well to enquire why this failure; the faithful pastor with a good reason for not co-operating in this matter will be glad of an opportunity to make known his reason; if any pastor has failed from neglect he should be taught that such neglect will not pass unnoticed by the Conference. The blank for Official Report asks the question and each pastor's report will show whether he did or did not meet this requirement. I recommend that March be named as Church Extension month, and that the Board continue to present the opportunity and the need, and to agitate and to urge.

Church Literature. It seems that we do not need to talk and write any more about the importance of using our literature, but go and use it. No Methodist Protestant Sunday-School should even entertain a thought other than to use our own literature. It should be our aim and effort to have one or more of our periodicals go regularly into each Methodist Protestant home. To this end the minister and the laity should be persistent. Each pastor should make a special study as to how he may do this thing and work without ceasing. It is to be much lamented that so many have dropped the Methodist Protestant with the coming of Our Church Record. It is time now that there be a reaction in this matter. He cannot be a broad-minded, well developed churchman who confines his church life within the borders of his own conference district. Many of our people are well able and should have appreciation sufficiently broad to subscribe for and read both Our Church Record and the Methodist Protestant. Then, too, the Woman's Missionary Record should be patronized and read by our people, that they may have information concerning and interest in Missions.

The pamphlet published to set forth the work and needs of our general interests has not been without honor save in our own state and among our own people. The hearty words of commendation received from some of our general agents and from one of our editors confirms me in the belief that the getting out of a larger, more artistic pamphlet, with a freer use of cuts, showing our church and

the various departments of her work in picture, may be with profit to the work. I am satisfied that we have more and better things than many of our people know. To know these things is to appreciate them. To appreciate them is to support them.

Church Education. A people that do not educate can be little more than hewers of wood and drawers of water for people that do educate. Perhaps no undertaking since the organization of our church should more thoroughly arouse and call into action all our latent powers and marshall all our forces as our educational enterprise. Heroic action, great faith and money constitute the need of the hour. However, before these can count for much we must have concentration of effort and concert of action. We may never all agree as to the thing best to do, but we certainly need to agree on some one thing we will do and then do it, all of us doing it, for it will require all of us to do a thing that is creditable. We may have diversity of opinion but we must have concert of action. The sentiment in the heart of every Methodist Protestant within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference should be: I have an opinion, indeed, a conviction as to what we would better do concerning our college enterprise. If the church will undertake to do just what I think we should do, I will put forth my very best endeavor to accomplish it. If the church will undertake to do something other than just what I think we should do, I will put forth my best endeavor to accomplish it-diversity of opinion, concert of action. Let the majority decide; then let all do.

Further, if we find that we cannot do now what we undertook to do, would we not better now undertake to do what we can do, and thus grow stronger to do what we first undertook to do? That is, if we cannot now build as large as we thought, would we not better build as large as we can and then grow to our larger plan? and then plan and grow to a still larger plan, and continue to plan and to grow? Our people begin to want to see something doing. Meanwhile we must look to the quality. If ours is not so large as the largest, it should be as good as the best. If we cannot educate extensively, we can the more easily educate intensively.

Finally. In these times of sweeping changes as a result of great progress there come to us great opportunities and correspondingly great responsibilities. There cannot come an opportunity without the accompanying responsibility. It is an age in which prompt decision and intense action are essential to success. This is true in church as in business affairs. Our young church should rejoice in the vigor of youth and go forward bravely to decide and to do. The need of the hour calls forth the best that is in the individual or in a church. We need a Cæsar's Tenth Legion or a Gideon's Band, who think of nothing but victory and success and the means to accomplish it. As our ancestry gave us church principles of which we are

proud, let us give to our posterity a church history of which they will be proud.

Memorial services were held in honor of the late Rev. John H. Totten and Mrs. W. A. Bunch.

MEMORIAL OF REV. JOHN H. TOTTEN

Again we are called upon to bemoan a reduction in our ranks. Our brother, Rev. John H. Totten is on earth no more. He has laid aside the weapons of Christian warfare and has been retired to the eternal camping ground of God's triumphant hosts. And now, since he has passed beyond our view, and we can hold no more direct communication with him, how fitting it is that we call to mind, in some degree, his life and character, and embalm his memory with a tribute of love in the archives of our Conference!

Brother Totten was the son of Richard and Diskin Totten, and was born in Caswell county, N. C., September 18, 1838. In his early young manhood he professed religion and joined the church at Mispah in Rockingham county. His piety and zeal soon brought him into prominence in his local church, and he was called to the offices of class leader and Sunday-School superintendent. In these capacities he served, it is thought, as long as he remained in that vicinity.

Something over thirty years ago he removed to Forsyth county, and settled near Kernersville. Not long after this he was licensed to preach by a Quarterly Meeting held at Pine Grove, then on Flat Rock circuit.

Our Conference Record of his pastoral service seems rather er-

ratic, but we give the best statement we can find.

It appears that he joined the Western North Carolina Conference in 1879, being recommended for Itinerary and Orders to this Conference. He was assigned to Surry Mission in 1880-81; to Alamance circuit in 1882; to Forsyth circuit in 1883; was left without appointment, at his own request, in 1884; name not found on Record in 1885; assigned to Mocksville circuit in 1886; name not found in 1887; served Pe Dee Mission in 1888; was Conference Evangelist in

1889. This is the last record of him until the Burlington Conference in 1896, when his name again appears. He served Spring church in 1898-99; Mocksville circuit in 1900-01; was supernumerary on Oak Ridge circuit in 1903; and served Albemarle circuit in 1905 up to the time of his last sickness.

One break in his record occurred during his absence in the state of Kansas about the year 1885, and another during the time he served the M. E. Church South, probably between the years 1890

and 1896.

This record, however, lacks much of making a complete memoir of the service he rendered the church and the world. He did much of what is termed local work. He delighted in preaching the Gospel and with much zeal and faithfulness he pressed its claims upon all, both saint and sinner. His was an experimental faith which left no room for cavil. He was firmly set in his trust in the Word of God, and to him the Word was precious. He believed much in the power of prayer—he was a man of prayer, his home was a house of prayer, and his family a family of prayer. Repeatedly he has been heard to say that he told his family they might hurry him at any time except the time to pray, then he would not be hurried. His form of prayer was always earnest and zealous; and often at the throne of grace his cry to God was truly touching and sublime. We may speak this good word for him with emphasis—he was always ready to preach or to pray.

Brother Totten was married twice, first to Miss Margaret F. Smith, and second to Miss Talitha C. Stanley. By his first marriage there were born to him two sons and two daughters; and by his last marriage one son and one daughter. His last wife preceded him to the grave something more than a year, and three sons and one daughter survive him. Two of his sons are preachers, and all

of his children are devoted Christians.

For some years Brother Totten had suffered, at intervals, with heart disease, but had rallied sufficiently to enable him to take up the work on Albemarle circuit about the first of this year. He seems to have maintained sufficient physical strength to meet the demands that were upon him until about the fourth Sunday in July, when he was taken sick with his old disease, but not so seriously as to cause immediate alarm. He was in the midst of a protracted meeting, and he continued through the week to attend church until the 5th Sunday, when he had a hard attack and became so very ill that his physician advised him to go home with his son, Rev. W. T. Totten, who was helping him in his meeting at the time.

They made speedy arrangements and started for Yadkin College. Arriving in Greensboro, it was found prudent, at least for the time being, to go no farther, hence they turned aside and stopped with his brother-in-law, Mr. John Smith. Here human skill and love did their best for his restoration, but without avail. On the 23d day of August, 1905, after much physical pain, but in much comfort of Christian hope, the end came, the rest ensued, for

the soldier had fought his last battle.

On motion of A. J. Harris, the resolution was turned over to the Board of Education.

Prof. T. C. Amick, principal of the Liberty Normal College, stated that the business men of Liberty had increased their offer to \$6,000 and 30 acres of land.

The Board of Education retired.

T. V. Avent was excused from further attendance.

T. J. Ogburn in the chair.

The following was adopted:

Resolved, That in the division of circuits having parsonages, that portion of the circuit that retains the parsonage shall make a just and equitable division of the parsonage property, paying a just pro rata part of the actual value of said parsonage property to the Quarterly Conference of the circuit so set off.

(Signed) A. J. HARRIS, C. H. WHITAKER.

Conference passed the characters of E. Suits and A. N. Brown.

A. J. Harris presented the following from Vance Circuit:

Whereas, It is represented to the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church in session in High Point, North Carolina, that a certain lot and the improvements situate at Dabney, N. C., on Vance circuit, was conveyed to the trustees for the use and benefit of said church as a parsonage or residence for the minister in charge of said circuit so long as Harris Chapel church and another or others shall be associated as a circuit, and then for the use of the minister of said church who shall be appointed to officiate at Harris Chapel church; and if it should cease to be used as such for the space of two years, then for the use and benefit of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church.

And whereas, it is thought by some to be desirable to sell said parsonage lot, and re-invest the proceeds in another parsonage located at some other place on Vance circuit;

Now, therefore, Resolved, By the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church that the trustees of the parsonage lot at Dabney on Vance circuit be and they are hereby directed to sell and convey the same and to re-invest the proceeds at such time and for such price and to locate or buy another at such place as the churches upon said circuit shall direct, whenever a majority of the members of the Methodist Protestant Church upon said circuit at each charge or appointment thereon shall, upon due notice being given of the time and place of voting upon the question, declare by their votes that such sale and removal and re-investment is desirable.

Provided, That the title to the property so to be acquired shall be conveyed and held upon the same uses, conditions and trusts as that now located at Dabney and sought to be sold.

Passed and adopted in open session of the Conference at High Point, N. C., November 27, 1905.

We would emphasize the fact that no one can be an intelligent Methodist Protestant and not read one or more of our church organs. It is a deplorable fact that many of our families prefer a secular paper to their own church paper. We insist that the church paper should be the first paper in every family. We therefore insist that each pastor and all others who feel an interest in our church, strive to place "Our Church Record," the organ of our North Carolina Conference, in every Methodist Protestant family; and, as far as possible, one or more of our general organs, viz.: "The Methodist Protestant," and "The Methodist Recorder."

We also would insist on a more general circulation of the "Woman's Foreign Missionary Record," the official organ of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the M. P. church.

COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

As an evidence that a more liberal spirit prevails, an unusual number of charges and of churches have paid all claims in full. And others came so near that it is a great pity they did not do just a lit-

tle more.

Beulah, Pleasant Hill; Rocky Mount and Harmony; Roanoke: Enfield, Roseneath, Speight's Chapel, Whitaker's Chapel, Whitaker's Temple; Stanley: Friendship, Love's Grove, Mill Grove, Simpson's, New London; West Lexington; Winston: Shiloh, Bethesda, Friendship, Yadkin College, Union Grove, Union Ridge; Winston Sta.; Yarboro Chapel.

We also recommend that the offerings for Foreign Missions be taken in June, and for superannuates in October; that the other months be used for special interests and to make up any deficiencies.

COMMITTEE TO DRAFT PLAN TO REGULATE WORK OF THE FACULTY

We recommend:

That the number of the members of the faculty be increased to twelve. That these be divided into four sub-committees to be known respectively as:

(a) Committee on Admission and Itinerancy, who shall have exclusive control of all examinations for admission to the class and for

all examinations for the Itinerancy;

(d) Committee of First Year, who shall examine all candidates in class of first year.

(c) Committee of Second Year, who shall examine all candidates in class of second year.

(d) Committee of Third Year, who shall examine all candidates

in class of third year.

(Amendment adopted: That each sub-committee be authorized to increase the number of its sub-committee, if found necessary in order to have one examiner to each study.)

2. That no candidate shall be advanced to class of first year until he has passed an approved examination before the committee on admission; nor to the second year until he has passed the first; nor to the third until he has passed the second.

3. That all examinations shall be approved by a majority of the members of the sub-committee to which the examination belongs.

4. That all recommendations for license to administer the ordinances and for ordination shall be approved by two-thirds of the entire committee.

That the committee be required to meet at the place selected for holding the Annual Conference, not later than 2 p. m., on the day preceding the opening of the Conference; to conduct all examinations and submit to the Conference a full report of its work before the close of the second day's session.

6. That J. F. McCulloch, R. M. Andrews, C. L. Whitaker consti-

tute the committee of Third Year; W. F. Kennett, J. F. Dosier, W. E. Swain, the committee of the Second Year; A. G. Dixon, C. A. Cecil, N. G. Bethea, the committee of the First Year; J. H. Stowe, Wm. Porter, T. M. Johnson, the committee on Admission and Itinerancy.

Report No. 12 TEMPERANCE

1. We are gratified to note the growth of temperance sentiment throughout the state; that so many towns and cities have voted out the saloon, that the Governor of our state is throwing his influence

on the side of temperance.

2. But we are pained to note that many towns still tolerate the saloon, while others have compromised by voting in the dispensary, which we conceive to be no better essentially and fundamentally than the saloon. Dispensary whiskey will intoxicate just the same as saloon whiskey. In the one instance the individual goes into the business of drunkard-making, while in the other it is the municipality. But the end reached in each case is the same—drunkenness with all its consequences.

3. Therefore we keep ourselves on record as unalterably and perpetually opposed to the manufacture, sale and use of every kind of intoxicating liquors as a beverage; and pledge ourselves to use our power and influence in every honorable and legitimate way to

"pulverize the rum power."

4. We also regard the deadly cigarette as a twin evil with intoxicating liquors. We are therefore equally opposed to this evil as to the drink habit.

Report No. 13 SUNDAY - SCHOOLS

Your committee is impressed that there is a great lack of interest in this important work. We realize the truth of Miss Willard's statement when she said, "The two chief cornerstones of the church are the family altar and the Sunday-School." We believe it is well to associate the two. For where we find the family altar we find the children in the Sunday-School. One of the first essentials in the Sunday-School is an interest manifested by the parents. Pastors should keep this vital question before their members. Great care should be taken in the selection of a leader. Parents should study

the lessons with their children. This should be done the first of the week, and not simply run hurriedly over the lessons on Sunday morning, as is the case in many instances.

Another essential is promptness as to the time of beginning. There should be a set time for beginning, and schools should begin

at that time.

We recommend that each pastor talk these things to his people from the pulpit and in his visits; and that he prove his sincerity by attending every session of the school that he possibly can.

We recommend the use of our own literature.

We recognize the valuable work done by the International Sunday-School Association, and recommend that our pastors and people take advantage of the benefits to be derived from the various state, county and township conventions.

PASTORAL WORK

The success of our church depends very much on its pastors. Not every preacher is a good pastor. Neither is every pastor a good preacher. What the church needs today is not men who can read Greek and Hebrew only, but pastors who will go from house to house and so live Christ as that the people shall be drawn to Him.

The time has come when it is necessary to do more pastoral work, whether we realize it or not. "How shall we reach our mem-

bers?" Go to see them, also write them a pastoral letter.

You cannot reach the people unless you know them. You cannot know them unless you visit them. It is around the fireside that we can find out something of the inner life of our people.

A pastor cannot accomplish much if he is not loved by his people. And he cannot find access to their hearts unless he does pastoral

work.

Some preachers ignore the social side of their work and to a certain extent destroy their usefulness. Some men cannot be brought to Christ until you win them socially. To do effective work as pastor, a preacher must be a man of quick perception and a good judge of human nature, must see in what respect his people are found wanting, and be qualified to supply their lack.

He should by all means visit the sick and the infirmed of his

charge. He must love his people and show it by his interest in their

temporal as well as their spiritual welfare.

Pastoral work is personal work. To do this, one must come into personal contact. Hence the necessity for going from home to home.

Realizing the importance of pastoral work, be it

Resolved, That each pastor be requested to report to this Conference the per cent. of his membership visited during the year.

MISSIONS

The salvation of Japan must inure to the evangelization of

China, and this to the universal spread of the Gospel.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

In view of the fact that the wisdom of locating our proposed College in Greensboro has been questioned, and that propositions

looking to locating elsewhere have been submitted to this Confer-

ence, we recommend:

I. That the number constituting the Board of Education be increased from eight to fifteen, six of whom shall be nominated by the Committee on Colleges and elected by this Conference, and one of whom shall be elected by the Board after the question of location shall have been finally decided.

2. That the Board be granted a Field Agent, for whom they shall arrange with the Stationing Committee, and an assessment be laid upon the various charges of the district to provide for his sal-

ary.

- 3. That the canvass for funds be pushed energetically for about sixty days, with a view to raising the full sum of \$100,000 if possible. But when subscriptions to the amount of \$75,000 have been received, the Board may then collect a sufficient amount and commence work. The Board may begin work with a less amount if it should be deemed advisable.
- 4. As soon as, in the judgment of the Board, the proper time has arrived, said Board shall decide where the College shall be located. And their decision shall be final.

Report No. 20 COLLEGES

The founders of the Methodist Protestant Church were educated, and believed in both an educated ministry and an educated laity. For this reason, they adopted a church policy which demands both. So insistent were they upon education that it was charged against them that they placed upon it too much emphasis. And there are still those who think that an educated head and a Spiritfilled heart are antagonistic. But this is an error. They are really complementary. Intellectuality and spirituality need not, and must not, be be divorced. To separate them means, in our church, death. For an educated people ours is an ideal polity. But, for an unedu-

cated people no polity could be more unfitted.

It is the function of education to develop manhood and womanhood. This cannot be done without the culture of the intellect, the sensibility and the will. The acquisition of knowledge is a very important factor in education, but it is by no means the most important factor. Love is greater than faith. Civilization is more of the heart than of the head. And before there can be any considerable degree of attainment in moral conduct, there must be a trained will. For the development of these faculties, no institution is so well fitted as the denominational college. We recommend, therefore, most heartily the effort now being made to establish a Methodist Protestant college within this state.

For the same reason, we recommend that, until such school is established, we patronize Western Maryland College, Adrian, and

Kansas City University.

Westminster Theological Seminary is each year becoming better equipped and is doing better work than ever before. It well deserves our financial support and patronage. In view of the fact that it will soon be necessary to enlarge this institution, we recommend that each pastor earnestly endeavor to secure every cent of the assessment.

RULES OF ORDER FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE.

- 1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's Annual Report.
- 2. At 3 c'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.
- 2. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.
- 4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of the Scripture and prayer, under the direction of the President.
- 5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.
- 6. It shall be the duty of the Chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflections or irrelevant debate.
- 7. The Chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.
- 8. All the committees shall be appointed by the Chair, unless otherwise ordered by the Conference.
- 9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
 - 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.
- 11. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the Chair.
- 12. No member shall be permitted to speak more than once on any question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.
- 13. No person shall pass between the Chair and a member while speaking, nor interrupt the speaker, except by permission to explain.
- 14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud to disturb the Conference.
- 15. Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.
- 16. Members are required to vote in all cases, except excused therefrom by the Conference.
- 17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.
 - 18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open

for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.

- 19 All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on the main question.
- 20. All questions of order arising after the previous question has been called for shall be decided without debate.
- 21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.
 - 22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.
- 23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- 24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be called up again during the session.
- 25. No person shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.
 - 26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.
- 27. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.

On motion the order of the day was waived till the question of reports should be decided. On motion of C. A. Cecil, the financial statistical reports for this year shall be made by circuits and not by churches.

On motion of C. A. Cecil, the reports for next year shall be made by circuits and not by individual churches.

The order of the day was the election of officers. T. M. Johnson was declared elected President, and the assist secretary was ordered to cast the ballot of the Conference for R. M. Andrews for secretary.

- T. M. Johnson and R. R. Ross were elected the Stationing Committee.
- G. W. Holmes, C. A. Cecil, J. D. Williams, A. M. Rankin, W. J. Williams, F. R. Harris, were elected Committee on Appeals.

The President added the name of C. W. Bailiff to the Committee on Statistics.

J. S. Williams was elected to take charge of the matter to be reported to the State press.

Dr. H. L. Eldercice addressed the Conference and secured \$75.00 to aid C. A. Swift to go to the Seminary.

The Conference then adjourned.

FIRST DAY-Evening Session.

The Conference sermon was preached by W. E. Swain.

11 a. m. tomorrow was made the order of the day to hear Dr. F. T. Tagg, editor of the Methodist Protestant.

Dr. W. D Morton, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of this place, was presented to the Conference.

A. M. Cook, the alternate delegate from Mebane, was seated as delegate in place of the absent delegate.

On motion the Conference Brotherhood will meet this afternoon at 3 p. m.

The following resolution was adopted: That the President of this Conference shall appoint a committee to nominate a Board consisting of three persons elected by ballot, whose duty it shall be to advise with the Board of Trustees of the new churches to be built in the towns and cities which shall desire aid from the Board of Church Extension, as to the best location of said churches. Signed by C. A. Cecil, R. M. Andrews.

This resolution was amended so as to read: That the Board of Church Extension shall not grant aid to a church when the location is not endorsed by the Advisory Board.

The President named the following to nominate this Board: C. A. Cecil, J. A. Turner, W. M. Pike.

Rev. Mr. Stamey, pastor of the M. E. Church, South, at Nashville, was introduced to the Conference.

The committee to nominate the Advisory Board to advise with the

Board of Trustees of churches nominated T. M. Johnson, S. R. Harris and W. A. Bunch, which were elected by the Conference.

On motion the next Conference will meet on Wednesday before the fourth Sunday in November, 1907.

The motion to appoint a committee to receive the invitations for the next Conference was lost.

It was carried that when this Conference adjourns this morning it adjourn to meet at 7:30 this evening, and that the committees be instructed to meet during the afternoon.

The Committee on Missions reported, the report was adopted. Report (24), part II.

The report of the Committee on Financial Statistics for the 5th Sub District was adopted.

Committees on Financial Statistics for the 2nd and 7th Sub Districts were submitted and adopted.

Conference adjourned.

MONDAY, FOURTH DAY-Evening Session.

On motion the three members of the Board of Conference Trustees, whose term of office expire at this Conference be re-elected.

Report No. 1.

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, Rocky Mount, N. C., November 22, 1906:

Dear Brethren: At the end of another year we now meet in the eighty-first session of our Conference. It gives me much pleasure to report that during the year just closed not one of our number has been called from labor to reward. But our hearts go out in sympathy to Bro. C. A. Cecil in the loss of his companion, perhaps the greatest loss that can come to one of mature years. Others of our number have had their hearts saddened by death entering their homes. With all these we sympathize and for them we pray that God's grace may sustain them.

Letter Granted. Almost by the time I reached my home from the session of our last Conference Rev. J. G. W. Holloway requested a certificate of his standing. This was granted. He has. I understand, joined another church, hence his name should be taken from our roll.

Fields Supplied. The report of the Stationing Committee of our last Conference showed six fields unsupplied. Two of these could have had the same men assigned then that have served as pastors this year had not their delegates gone home before Conference adjourned. Another of the number could have had a pastor assigned then if the delegates hands had not been tied by action of the Quarterly Conference.

ence. Surry, another of the number, should have been dropped from the Conference roll as there is really no Surry circuit, practically all of it that is at all active having been attached to other fields. This name should be dropped by this Conference. After Conference adjourned Rev. W. C. Hammer was assigned to Albemarle. Rev. C. W. Bates, from Western Maryland College, was assigned to Buncombe to serve during vacation, Rev. J. S. Williams, the Asheville pastor, having looked after the field the balance of the year. Rev. I. I. York was assigned to Ivy; Rev. S. W. Taylor, a Seminary student, to Plymouth and Edenton during vacation; Rev. J. B. Parham, to Monroe.

Other Charges. Early in January Rev. R. L. Clinton, by his own request, was released from Stanley. Rev. T. F. McCulloch was assigned to that field for the remainder of the year. During the latter part of August Rev. T. H. Matthews was assigned associate pastor of Mocksville, that the pastor, Rev. G. L. Reynolds might take charge of the Denton school. About three months ago the pastor of Roanoke, Rev. G. H. Austin, requested that on account of the condition of his wife's health he be released from the work. The request was granted since which time the field has been without a pastor.

A Communication. The last Conference instructed the President to write Rev. H. J. Hartsell and report to this Conference concerning his plans and desire as to his connection with the North Carolina Conference. Bro. Hartsell writes that it is not his purpose to return to the North Carolina Conference. He wishes his membership, if agreeable, to remain with us this year. Next year he expects to transfer to the Washington Conference, where he is doing some church work.

Revivals. The most notable revival of the year was that at Bala Mills, Concord, under the direction of the Concord pastor, Rev. D. A. Braswell. This meeting in the number of conversions surpassed that most remarkable Winston revival of last year, numbering more than three hundred. This was a mission point, but a church of one hundred and fifty members was immediately organized. Other revivals have been spoken of as more than ordinary, but as a whole they have been perhaps an average. I believe we should pray more for and expect more of the revival.

A Ways and Means Member. Near the close of last session of Conference, Rev. N. G. Bethea was elected chairman of the Committee of Ways and Means in place of Rev. C. H. Whitaker resigned. Soon after Conference Bro. Bethea wrote me that for sufficient reason he could not serve. This committee being elective I had no authority to accept a resignation or to fill a vacancy. Practically there was a vacancy and the committee was without a chairman. Hence, there would be no one really studying during the year this important subject of church finance, for the purpose of making plans for the development of our people. This condition would thwart in part the very purpose

for which the members of this committee are elected for a term of years. For this reason I asked Rev. J. H. Bowman to study the question and make plans as though he were chairman and give the Conference or rather the Committee on Ways and Means the benefit of his thinking.

It was suggested that Bro. Bowman obtain and combine in a plan for raising finances features of plans that have been effective, that this plan of combined features be presented to Conference for approval. If approved then let the Conference offer free of charge to pastors who will use the plan the necessary envelopes or cards for carrying out the plan, the expense of it to be borne by the Conference out of the funds collected. This plan not in anyway to interfere with the work on fields that already pay all claims. The use of this plan to be entirely voluntary. The purpose is to help such fields as do not raise all claims, and to work toward a unifrom plan for all the fields or most of them. I recommend that right early in the session a man be elected to fill this vacancy, also that right soon the plan resulting from Bro. Bowman's efforts be put into the hands of the Committee on Ways and Means for consideration.

Report Blank. From the printed minutes it is not clear what the action of last Conference was regarding the form of report blank for financial statistics. The man occupying the chair at the time of the action or the Secretary could not tell me from memory. The man who made the original motion and the man who made a motion to amend had directly opposite opinions as to whether the action requires these reports to be made by circuits or by churches. All this left me in confusion and uniformed as to the kind of blank to prepare. I was not in the Conference room at the time of the action and had nowhere else to turn for authoritative information. I then prepared a blank embodying the features involved in both the original motion and the amendment, so that the Conference may print in the minutes the reports by circuits or by churches, also stating both the claim and the amount received of each interest or not. I recommend that Conference by formal action instruct early in the session the Committees on Financial Statistics in what form to prepare these reports for the minutes. I also recommend that Conference by formal action state for the future in a plain way whether these reports are to be made by circuits or by churches and thus avoid the confusion arising from the talk about "one line" and "two lines" in these reports.

Extensive Growth. That part of our work known as "Church Extension" should be pushed with greater vigor. It is a conviction with me that the Board of Church Extension should in a still more vigorous and systematic way look after the collecting of the funds for this important work, making great and persistent effort to push the total of the collections up to the full \$3,000.00. I note with pleasure that

more has been done in this way than formerly. In many instances pastors need to cultivate among the people a broader interest in this work. He is entirely too narrow whose interest in church extension work is purely or mainly local. The great changes and shifting in population still going on continue yet to keep open to us this our second opportunity to enter the towns and to occupy territory that could have and should have been done years ago. We should not be too stupid to see or too indolent to enter this door of opportunity while it remains open. If we do not enter, the door will close perhaps never again to open to us.

Intensive Growth. But one of our greatest needs today is the better cultivation of the ground we now occupy in the larger development of our people. We cannot determine our success during the year by counting the number of members received or by counting our net increase. That is part of it, but it is only part, the development of the individual member is also a part, a very important part, a large part. This important part of our success cannot be counted by figures or calculated by arithmetic. To this development of his members the pastor should devote much time and thought, though it is something he cannot report in full if at all to Conference.

Change of Pastors. At each Conference there are more or less changes of pastors. These changes are in some instance wise, in other instances they are necessary. But when a demand for a change is made just to gratify the whim of one member or of a few members, it is neither necessary nor wise. When the demand for a change is to gratify somebody's whim like unto the whim of a spoiled child no allowance is made for the excellent work, it may be, of the pastor. It may have been a pastorate of during which there have been good revivals, large increase in membership, the financial record may be the best in the history of the church or circuit, the pastor may have served that charge for only a year or two, yet a change is demanded. You ask why. The only real reason that can be given is that a certain individual or a few individuals wants a change. What difference if the pastor must endure the hardship and bear the heavy expense of moving? What if the pastor is humiliated, even injured, by having brought to a sudden close a thus-far successful but immature pastorate? Why, no matter about that, a certain individual wants a change and it must be arbitrarily made no matter who suffers. Such changes, such treatment is uncalled for, unjust, cruel, unworthy of Christian action.

Men and the Ministry. It is with much pleasure I report that four well-equipped, promising young men come next May from the Seminary to us not only ready but eager for work. These are Brothers Geo. L. Curry, Chas. J. Edwards, A. Oscar Lindley, S. W. Taylor. There are several other promising young men in the schools in prep-

aration for this same great work. This promising prospect is no doubt due at least in part to the prayer of the church for more men to enter the ministry. Let us then continue this prayer. I recommend that Conference again call upon our people to make special prayer to this end during the month of May. But let us with great faith and earnestness continue the prayer throughout the year.

The Superannuate. He is here. We should think of him not as a burden or a care, not as a relic of the past or the remains of other years, but we should think of him as an inspiration to our people, both ministry and laity, and as an encouragement to the work. Is there one with life so small, or heart so cold, or nature so benumbed by ingratitude that he is not enlarged and warmed and quickened when he is allowed the high privilege of associating with these brethren, fathers I should say, who have borne the burdens and endured the hardships of other years and thus made possible our now Methodist Protestant Church? What should we do with him? Do you ask? Honor him, care for him, support him, as you would your aged father. This not simply because of what he has done, but because of what he now is to us. Not a mere pittance, but a support should be his portion from our treasury.

I recommend that the Committee on Ways and Means ask for a considerably larger amount for this fund. I also recommend that the Superannuated Fund Society make considerably larger allowance in cases where there is real need, and we certainly have such. We should increase the fund, of course, but this should be done not by making smaller appropriations but by asking for larger contributions.

Better Pastoral Support. One of the great problems in life is the matter of a support for oneself and for those dependent upon him. Here, too, is one of man's first duties, it is also a great privilege and may be a great pleasure. In the life of the pastor the matter of his support and that of his family is in part the problem of the Church. It is one of the Church's first duties, is also the Church's great privilege and may be the Church's great pleasure.

The time has passed when we should allow our church to be thought of as a cheap Church. If a thing is wanted cheap, a low grade must be accepted. Ours is not a low grade, hence it should not be wanted cheap. Rather, ours is not a low grade unless you lower the grade by reducing the cost. Yes, whether you will it or not, there is this commercial feature in Church matters, namely, a relation between cost and quality. The one cannot be down while the other is up. Both of necessity must be down or up together. That our pastors should have a better support no one who thinks denies. This for both the comfort of the pastor and his family and for the higher development of the work. Our laymen are to be highly commended for the interest they have manifested in the recent "Laymen's Movement" looking to

a general increase in pastor's salaries. Those who have written for the columns of Our Church Record devoted to this movement have without exception, I think, spoken out of the depth of their souls and given expression to an abiding conviction that our ministry should have a better support. Others have from time to time expressed a keen interest in this movement who have not written for publication. Not only this but a number of fields have made a very substantial increase of salary for next year. In some instances the increase has been twenty-five per cent. or more.

In this agitation for an increase and in the actual increase two things have been manifest. One is that when our people, the laity, see their duty they are willing to do it. The other is that our laity have confidence in our ministry and in our cause. These laymen sat down and wrote, then rose up and acted, bringing to pass the very thing they said ought to be done—a splendid way to make one's own writing effective.

Another matter in this connection of great importance is the paying of the pastors' salaries in a regular and systematic manner during the year. There has been improvement in this, some paying by the quarter, some by the month, others more often. I recommend that pastors in a wise, discreet manner, quietly, through the stewards or other leaders encourage the systematic paying of pastors' salaries. One twelfth each month perhaps is best in most instances.

Better Pastoral Service. The laymen are beginning to do larger things; let us as preachers begin to do larger things. They give us a better support; let us give them a better service. They saw their duty and manifested a willingness to do it; let us see our duty and manifest a willingness to do it. They showed their confidence in us and in the cause; let us strengthen their confidence by showing our confidence in them and in the cause. They expect a better service to accommpany the better support and they have a right to expect it. They have told me so and through me they now tell you and they have a right to tell us so. We have told them that with a better support they may expect a better service; let us show them we were sincere when we said it. I for one appreciate it when these kind-hearted laymen, who love the preachers and the cause, come to me and say that the preacher needs, in order to succeed, to put into his work—not his preaching alone but his work—the same thought, energy, effort, time that men in other professions or in business must put into their profession or their business in order to succeed. This is a very mild, inoffensive way of telling us that as they see it some of us are not doing this.

The duty of the Church is to support the preacher; the duty of the preacher is to work, work to extend and build up the Church and to save the world. The Church should support him in order that he

may work. He should work, not because he is supported, but because that is what he is for. If he does not work he forfeits not his right to subsist but his right to exist. If the Church does not support the preacher it fails of what is at once one of the greatest duties and one of the highest privileges that comes to any organization. If he does not work he betrays the greatest trust ever committed to man.

Our Church Literature. Our Sunday School literature commends itself because of its neatness, its attractiveness, its merit. The Methodist Protestant is not only one of the oldest religious periodicals in this country but is one of the most strongly edited. Our Church Record has been and is a great factor in the development of the work in our State. We note with pleasure the improvement in the matter it contains, and with equal pleasure we note the recent improvement in the size and appearance of this paper. We note, too, the improved form of the Woman's Missionary Record, a paper that should be read by all of our people. A copy of the New Guide should go from the Sunday School each Sunday into the homes of all of our people especially where there are young people.

The Spirit of Unity. We started out with the thought that we could have a school if we could raise sufficient funds. We did not fail to realize that there would be some difficulty in properly manning the school from the resources at our command. We knew also that the matter of location is important and that a mistake should not be made here. Each of these three matters presented a difficult problem. We supposed that if these could be properly solved there would be practically no other problem to perplex us. But later a problem presents itself more difficult of solution than any one of these or than all of them combined. Until this other problem is solved we cannot build or run a school or do any other great thing worthy of a denomination whose principles are as attractive as ours. If we had \$300,000 cash in hand, if we had choice of absolutely any location we want, if we had at our command absolutely all the best teaching and managing force in the State, we could not have a school unless we are united. This then is our greatest problem—unity. The getting of the funds is not the great problem. We can get the funds if we are united. Fixing the location is not the great problem, we can fix the location if we are united. Manning the school is not the great problem, we can man the school if we are united.

But so long as one of our 20,000 Methodist Protestants in the State says, "I will not help unless the buildings face the north;" another says, "I will not help unless they face the east;" another says, "I will not help unless they face the south;" another says, "I will not unless they face the west;" and each of the other nineteen thousand nine hundred and ninety-six Methodist Protestants make excuse about as flimsy. So long as this state of affairs exists we can never build

a school or do anything else worthy of us. No matter whether this undertaking, or any other, face the north, the east, the south, the west, but let this and all other of our undertaking face the future and we all, twenty thousand strong, face the future with them. Then we can do things and command respect. Funds, location, men, the spirit of unity, these four, but the greatest of these is the spirit of unity.

Our Opportunity. When times are prosperous, when changes are being made the Church, as does the individual, has opportunity to improve its condition. The times are now prosperous, great changes are taking place. Our natural resources are being developed as never before. Companies for business purposes are forming, factories are being erected, towns are being extended and new ones built, great wealth is being accumulated. Let the Church see the opportunity of the hour, arise and act. However, you may have been thinking about it there never was a brighter outlook for our Church than now, if we use our opportunity. It is not a time for halting, but a time for heroic action by heroic men. If we be such men, we will perform such action. Our opportunity is great, let our action be great. To our beloved Zion I would say: "Arise, shine, for thy light is come. . . . Lift up thine eyes round about, and see."

Praying that the spirit of the Master, which is the spirit of love and of unity, may characterize all our actions and all our utterances during this session and during the coming year, and thanking you all for your unifrom, kindness, I am, Fraternally,

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your committee is glad to note so far as it has been enabled to learn that there has been a greater interest taken in Sunday School work on the part of our people the past year, than during any previous year of our existence as a church.

3d. We recommend that a general supervisor be elected at the first Quarterly Conference whose business it shall be to visit as far as possible the schools in the bounds of his circuit. To call and arrange for a circuit Sunday School convention at which they may discuss and arrange for a better and more systematic plan of conducting Sabbath Schools.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION,

Your Board of Education would submit the following report to this session of the North Carolina Annual Conference:

That on the 28th day of February, 1906, this Board met in Greensboro to consider the college matter. At this session propositions were received from High Point, Greensboro, Oak Ridge, Liberty, Pinnacle and Hillsboro. All of which seemed to the Board to be liberal and worthy of their consideration, and in pursuance of which a committee was appointed to visit and examine the properties, which was done and reports made to the full Board on Marth the 8th, 1906, in Greensboro. That on this date a very liberal proposition was made by the

people of Pilot Mountain, which proposition was duly considered among the rest. After careful consideration of the various propositions balloting was proceeded with which resulted in an expression of the Board's choice of Oak Ridge. Whereupon a committee was appointed to consider and work out all the details of the matter and make report of their investigations to the Board.

The committee after very careful investigation and consideration could not effect a trade, having found that the total of the subscriptions in round numbers, \$55,000.00, was pledged on the condition that \$100,000.00 shall be subscribed before the pledges could be available; and that if the above stated condition did not exist, that still another barrier to the progress in the matter existed, in the lact that the amount subscribed was largely due and payable, if payable at all, in four annual instalments.

A further obstruction to their work was the fact that of the \$55,000 before mentioned, a large amount was subscribed conditioned on location, which condition had not been met, thus leaving the Board without available assets.

In view of this condition the Board of Education would submit it as their opinion that it is better for the work of our Church in this State that the discussion of the matter and the matter itself be postponed.

We would heartily commend the zeal and work of the Rev. A. G. Dixon, and state that the condition existing was not caused by any lack of business or personal qualifications on his part, but that it has grown out of the varied and changing conditions of the college matter from its beginning.

As a matter of information to this Conference we would submit the following report of the value of the property now held by this Board in Greensboro, the properties now held by R. H. Brooks, J. Norman Wills, and R. M. Andrews, as trustees, is valued at \$9,777.57, with liabilities at \$5,500. And we would recommend that this annual Conference re-elect the said R. H. Brooks, J. Norman Wills and R. M. Andrews as trustees of the aforesaid property. And that they are hereby authorized and empowered to sell or borrow money and to make and execute and deliver as trustees, one, or more mortgages or deeds of trust upon all or any part of the real estate held by them as trustees for the college enterprise, whenever in their opinion it is necessary so to do; provided said Conference is to be in no manner responsible for any debt thus incurred over and above the property held by the said trustees.

- 3. This Board appropriated two hundred and fifty dollars last December (1905) for the purchase of a lot for a church in West Greensboro, which sum has been paid, having been advanced by Grace Church, Greensboro, \$100, and \$150 by Bro. Geo. B. Harris, who loaned same without interest.
- 4. The Board also appropriated and paid for purchase of the Asheville church on January 1, 1906, two hundred dollars on first lot. On May 28, 1906, being further consulted by Bro. J. S. Williams as to the wisdom of purchasing a lot and building at Asheville for \$9,500.00, 11 which he had procured an option, this Board was unable to incur or assume so large a debt, but authorized Bro. Williams to ascertain the amount he can raise for said purpose within the limits of his option and if he can with the cash on hand secure good pleges for \$2,000.00, the amount of the first payment the Board would advise the purchase of the lot in question. Further than this the Board has not gone.

We are of the opinion that the interests of the Church and the necessities of those receiving a support in whole or in part from this Board

require that the funds collected should be collected and paid over early in the year.

6. In view of the more central location of Greensboro, we recommend that the office and place of meetings of said Board be removed to Greensboro and that Brother J. Norman Wills be elected treasurer thereof. The business of the Board has been conducted from Henderson for five years.

LITERATURE.

A church whose government is "of the people, for the people, by the people" necessitates a high grade of average intelligence in its constituency.

Your Committee on Literature would therefore urge the importance of "our own" literature for our people. For this information can be gleaned from no other source so successfully as from our own papers.

We, therefore, insist that every family in the district take at least one copy of the Methodist Protestant that we may keep in touch with the general interest of the Church. We recommend that our people write for the Methodist Protesant and in this way make it easier to secure subscribers and at the same time prevent our isolation from the Church at large.

The Woman's Missionary Record in its line is doing a good work. If you would be missionary indeed and truth you must need a missionary paper. We would therefore commend "The Woman's Missionary Record" for your consideration and patronage.

We would also urge the importance of our own Sunday School literature. Nothing so strongly tends to develop loyalty to our Church as our own literature in every department of church life.

We also heartily recommend "Our Church Record" as our organ in the State. It behooves us to read all of every issue that we may keep in touch with our local interests. We would commend the progressiveness of the editor in furnishing a new and modern press. This outlay renders necessary the hearty support of the entire membership in the bounds of the N. C. Conference.

Report No. 22.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS.

We are glad to note that a more liberal spirit is manifest on the part of our people, and feel grateful for the increase of our collections. This we believe is due largely to the use of better plans. We believe when proper plans are adopted by our circuits and churches, and these plans thoroughly worked the financial problem will be largely solved.

We recommend the following for adoption:

In view of the fact that our laymen have entered so heartily into and have taken such an active interest in the increasing of our pastors' salaries, which already has been the means of a considerable increase of salary on a goodly number of our charges. Therefore,

Resolved, That this Annual Conference express to them our highest appreciation, and pray God's increased blessings, both spiritual and temporal, upon them.

- 2. In view of the fact that the salary received by most of our pastors is out of all proportion to the wages received for other skilled labor and is not keeping pace with the increased wages of other labor, we, therefore believe it to be the duty of our pastors to ask for and even insist upon higher salaries.
- 3. We believe the opportionment plan to be the most equitable and successful plan for collecting pastor's salary. Therefore we recommend this plan and insist upon the use of it.
- 4. In view of the fact that the pastor needs his salary as it becomes due to meet current expenses for want of it he is often much embarrassed, and as we believe our people would not willingly withhold from their pastor the money that is due him, and that would be so much appreciated, and is so badly needed by him, be it therefore, Resolved, that the membership at each church be insisted upon to meet their obligations to their pastors monthly, and that each steward be urged to make special effort to pay one-twelfth of pastor's salary monthly. We believe this plan will be much better for the people also, and if once tried will be appreciated by them.
- 5. Resolved, That one of the stewards at each church be expected to read the above resolution as early as practicable after the Annual Conference.
- 6. That the pastor shall call the attention of the steward to this resolution and see that it is read. Realizing the fact that on a great many of our circuits and at a great many of our churches a better plan for collecting the general intrests is needed, your committee wrote to about twenty of our pastors for what they believed to be the best plan. Gleaning from their reports, we have formulated the following plan, which we recommend to be used where a successful plan is not already in operation.
- 1. Lump the General Interests all together, and, by a committee appointed by the church, apportion it among the members, adding as much as is thought may be necessary for non-collection.
- 2. The members's name with his or her part be placed on an envelope like the following:

- 3. Divide the envelopes into as many parcels as is thought necessary. Make a list of the names and amounts of each, appoint a young lady, or some one else for each list, and let them give out the envelopes and collect the amounts. Hold Children's Day and Easter service and this will decrease the deficit, if any.
- 4. Where this plan cannot be used, we recommend that the pastor use the same envelope and see as many of the members as he can personally and let them make their own assessments, place the amount on the envelope and then collect in person or by proxy.
- 5. Let each pastor that can use the envelopes notify the chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means early the number needed by him and they will be furnished free.
- 6. The cost of envelopes, etc., to be taken proportionately out of the money for General Interests. We recommend that March be Church Extension month, April Home Mission month, June Foreign Mission month, July Ministerial Education and Theological Seminary, October for the rest.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Nearly two thousand years ago our Master in delivering to his disciples his final charge said: "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost." We must engage in mission work because Jesus commands it. The condition of the heathen requires it; and our highest interest as a church demands it. Our efforts in the foreign field have been greatly blessed of God, and our success has been such as to fill our hearts with gratitude and hope.

The past year, ending March 31, 1906, was the best year in all our mission history. Pastors reported to the last Annual Conference: Baptisms, adults 130, children 13; probationers received, 191; increase in membership, 123; present members, including 117 baptised children on probation, 955; 23 regular preaching places, with 12 organized churches; 27 Sunday Schools, with 1,481 scholars; 8 church buildings and 4 parsonages, worth \$12,693—and college and school property worth \$30,000. There had been as many students at the college and night school as the buildings could accommodate. The workers had been faithful, the opportunities great and the outlook full of promise. The late Annual Conference, March 29-31, is referred to as the very best in the history of the work.

A door of opportunity now stands open to us in Japan such as we have never seen before. Sad and unfortunate it will be for our church if we do not vigorously seize this opportunity.

The strong appeal from Rev. T. J. Ogburn, our efficient and faithful Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions should arouse our people to a sense of our responsibility to send to others the word of life; and and to increase our contributions to this cause so dear to the heart of our Lord.

Our people have been delighted with the splendid addresses of Miss Margaret M. Kuhns. We hope she has not only succeeded in securing contributions but that our interest in foreign missions has been deepened.

We are glad to know that the Board of Home Missions is in a prosperous condition and is meeting with success in planting our church in the great West and other destitute religious sections of our country.

We recommend that all our pastors urge the holding of an Easter service in each church, and that an earnest effort be made to raise the assessment (ten cents per member) for Home Missions.

The success of Church Extension in our own State should stimulate us to greater liberality. This field is continually widening and the Board is limited in its work by lack of funds.

RULES OF ORDER FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE.

- 1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's Annual Report.
- 2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.
- 3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.
- 4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of the Scripture and prayer, under the direction of the President.
- 5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.
- 6. It shall be the duty of the Chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflections or irrelevant debate.
- 7. The Chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.
- 8. All the committees shall be appointed by the Chair, unless otherwise ordered by the Conference.
- 9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
 - 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.
- 11. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the Chair.
- 12. No member shall be permitted to speak more than once on any question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.
- 13. No person shall pass between the Chair and a member while speaking, nor interrupt the speaker, except by permission to explain.
- 14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud to disturb the Conference.
- 15. Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.
- 16. Members are requested to vote in all cases, except excused therefrom by the Conference.
- 17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.
- 18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.

- 19. All amendments shall be disposedd of before the vote is taken on the main question.
- 20. All questions of order arising after the previous question has been called for shall be decided without debate.
- 21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.
 - 22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.
- 23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- 24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be called up again during the session.
- 25. No person shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.
 - 26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.
- 27. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.

CONSTITUTION OF THE LAYMEN'S ASSOCIATION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST PROTESTANT CHURCH.

Article First.

Name—The name of this association shall be the "Laymen's Assosiation of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church."

Article Second.

Object—Its object shall be to promote the Glory of God and to extend His kingdom in such specific ways as may be designated hereafter.

Article Third.

Membership—Any layman may become a member upon the payment of an admission fee of \$1.00.

Article Fourth.

Dues—There shall be an admission fee of \$1.00 and annual dues of 50 cents each year thereafter.

Article Fifth.

Officers—The officers shall be a president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer, who, together with two others, shall constitute an executive committee who shall have charge of all business between the meetings of the association. The officers shall perform the duties usually performed by such officers.

Article Sixth.

Meetings—There shall be a meeting for the transaction of business and for the discussion of matters of interest to the church at such time and place as may be designated by the executive committee. At the first meeting, however, the Association may decide upon the time and place for the subsequent meeting and each subsequent meeting may decide upon the time and place for the meeting following, but in event of failure to so decide, the matter shall be left in the hands of the Executive Committee.

Article Seventh.

Amendments—This constitution may be amended by a vote of twothirds of the members present at any regular annual meeting.

Report No. 1.

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, in Session, Greensboro, N. C., November 20, 1907:

Dear Brethren—Since we last met in annual session our hearts have twice been made sad by the death of a member. Early in the year Bro. W. W. Amick obeyed the summons from labor to reward; late in the year Bro. W. A. Bunch passed over in response to a similar summons. Thus two of our faithful ones, tried and true, each of which has done much to make our church what it now is, have passed from our midst and can meet with us on earth no more. While we mourn our own loss our hearts go out in sympathy to the bereaved families. Revs. D. A. Highfill, W. C. Kennett and J. W. Frank were appointed Obituary Committee for Bro. Amick; Revs. W. C. Hammer, W. E. Swain and J. F. McCulloch for Bro. Bunch. These will report at the proper time when a memorial service should be held.

Released and Appointed. Soon after Conference Rev. J. B. Parham at his own request was released from the Mecklenburg Circuit, because of conditions that made it impossible for him to develop the work. Rev. T. A. Plyler was assigned to that field for the remainder of the year. Because of conditions on Monroe that hindered the work of Rev. C. W. Bailiff as pastor, he was granted a release at his own request, since which time the field has been without a pastor. In the midst of the year, because of financial troubles, Rev. G. H. Leary asked to be released from the Greenville and Spring Church Circuits, which was granted. He did not ask for a letter but his name should be stricken from our list. No satisfactory supply could be procured at once and they finally decided to go through the remainder of the year without a pastor. A little later at his own request Rev. S. E. Lucas was granted both a release from the Halifax Circuit and a certificate of good standing. The reason he gave me was a lack of support, and my understanding was that it was his purpose to enter a business life. His name should be stricken from the roll. Rev. D. A. Fishell has since been looking after the interests of that field. Late in the year Rev. T. S. Coble quit the work on Fairfield Circuit and asked for a letter. This was denied on the ground that he had not fully complied with his engagements to the Conference. The reason he assigned was a lack of support. His name should be stricken from the list. The field has since been without a pastor. Stanley having been left unsupplied by the last Conference, Rev. A. Oscar Lindley, a graduate from the Seminary, was assigned to that field and entered upon the work in May.

Boundaries. The Boundary Committee should make such recommendations as will add sufficient strength to Fairfield to support a pas-The saving of this work depends upon it. Union Hill formerly part of Surry circuit desires such relation to some field as will give them preaching services. The Boundary Committee should take this matter in hand. Poplar Springs formerly of Surry circuit seems to be extinct. The Boundary Committee should ascertain as to this and direct as to the disposition of the property. Grace church, Monroe circuit, has some trouble and was trying to change its relationship, but had not been able to do so the last report I had. I recommend that the Boundary Committee investigate this and take such steps as will protect our property interests. A church in the territory of Winston circuit through the pastor and quarterly conference of that circuit came from another denomination to ours. Of this the Boundary Committee should take note, but I suppose the Winston circuit will call their attention to this.

Our Program. Something more than a vote of thanks is due the people who entertain the Conference. The public rightfully expects something besides routine business. We ourselves should desire and expect at our annual coming together to receive inspiration and to have our thought quickened. Because of these three reasons—and they are splendid reasons—the chairman of the Committee on Pulpit Service has prepared a program. We all are agreed I presume as to the excellence of it. Some think we shall not have time to carry it out in the time alloted and transact the business of the Conference. Others think we can do both. Let us test the matter by trying.

Church Union. This subject I mention not to discuss it but to suggest that we do not discuss it with the view of declaring ourselves as a Conference either for or against the movement. The matter will come before our General Conference to which we elect representatives at this session; but it would certainly be a mistake at this stage to instruct these representatives as to whether they shall vote for the movement or against it. Leave their action to them to act according to the fuller light they may then have. That which each of us should do is to ascertain whether or not the hand of the Lord is in the movement and govern ourselves accordingly. To act now would be premature.

Asheville. Of the new points taken up in recent years perhaps none have been more interesting than Asheville. One very hopeful indication is that those who are best acquainted with the work there are the most hopeful of its final success. Those who are not hopeful concerning it are in every instance I think persons who are not acquainted with the facts. This is always the case where hope and faith have facts for their basis. I am satisfied that any thinking fairminded person will be hopeful of that work if he will go on the ground and remain long enough to become acquainted thoroughly with the facts, spending a Sunday with the faithful band in their services and talking with them of their plans and work. Doubtless we have a number of successful churches that had in the beginning no better prospect if as good as this church enterprise. But some say it is too much money to put into a church plant. Yet in almost any daily paper you will see that several times as much has been put into a factory plant or into the plant of some other business enterprise, and this is the glory of the South. How much better is a church than a factory.

Literature. A people or a church that has no literature is poverty stricken mentally. But if we have a literature and do not use it we are still poor. Literature has no value, imparts no power, except as it is used. The name of Our Church Record should be a household word and the paper itself a household article in every home in our Conference. This to strengthen and intensify our local church life. One of our general organs the Methodist Protestant or the Methodist Recorder should be, not a visitor or a guest, but one of the family in each of our homes. This to broaden our church life. The Woman's Missionary Record and the Home Missionary Bulletin should be constantly in our homes, creating there a missionary atmosphere for our children to breathe that they may grow up to be a generation of missionaries. Surely it does not need to be said that all our Sunday Schools should use our own literature. But that which I would urge there is not time or space to argue it—that our Sunday Schools provide each family, weekly, with a copy of the New Guide. This to help in the forming of the characters of our boys and girls who will be the men and women after awhile.

Education. A few years ago a school property at Denton, Davidson county, was offered to us at a bargain. About the time it was decided by some of our leading men to purchase this property for the church our Conference put a man into the field to canvass for our college enterprise. Hence it was decided not to attempt that purchase then lest it interfere with the canvass for the College enterprise. When our Conference decided a year ago not to press the College enterprise further for the time it seemed well then to raise the money for the purchase of the Denton property for the church. At my request Messrs. O. R. Cox and R. H. Brooks investigated the matter, visiting Denton to

examine the property and view the situation. They reported the school as well located for a local high school for the development of our people in that part, that the property is in good condition, and that at the present prices of real estate and building construction it would cost nearly or quite double the amount for which it is offered to us, \$2,200.00 being the price at which it is offered. They recommend that \$800.00 of the purchase price be collected in and around Denton and the other \$1,400.00 be collected elsewhere, that the property be deeded to our church to be controlled by a board of governors or trustees to be elected by the person contributing the purchase money. They show their faith in the undertaking by contributing \$100,00 each, of the money needed.

Rev. G. L. Reynolds, principal of the school which numbers more than 60 pupils, is raising the \$800.00 in and around Denton. I have been procuring pledges as I had opportunity for the other \$1,400.00 most of which has been pledged but some is lacking yet. The almost universal approval of this plan for the church to do local educational work leads me to think that it will be practical for this Conference to elect a committee of laymen and ministers to complete this work of raising the funds and purchasing the Denton property, also to extend the plan of doing preparatory or high school work by establishing or procuring schools for the church at such other points as seems to the committee practical and advisable. I recommend the electing of such a committee.

Sometimes the question is asked, "What shall we do with Yadkin College High School?" Let it be a part of this plan of local schools and use it to educate and develop our people. That's what schools are for. As soon think of a manufacturer selling his machinery as for us to think of selling our machinery.

Sanctification. It is not my purpose to discuss the merits of this doctrine but to call attention to a fact growing out of its teaching that is proving hurtful. Some, it would seem, have undertaken to handle the extreme sanctificationist and they themselves have become extreme anti-sanctificationists. These two, the extreme sanctificationist and the extreme anti-sanctificationis are more like than unlike each They are alike in that both believe in sanctification. anti usually prefaces his remarks by saying that he believes in sanctification. Then again they are alike in that both are extremists. one is an extremist for sanctification, the other an extremist, not against sanctification, but against the extreme views of the first named. So that it turns out that the anti becomes an extremist, the very thing he objects to in the other. Once more, the sanctificationist is a severe critic against the man who does not see as he sees; the anti also becomes a severe critic against the man that does not see as he sees, and in this, too, is like the other. So that if-emphasis on IF

-the sanctificationist is a fool the anti has answered him according to his folly and become like him. But in one other particular yet they are alike. The sanctificationist it is said by his methods diverts the efforts of some of the best workers or stops them altogether from church work. It turns out that the anti does the very same thing. A faithful and efficient worker has been driven from the pastorate at least temporarily as a result of the efforts of the rantankerous antisanctificationist. And the worst of it is that the things charged against this worker seem to be entirely without foundation, let us hope ignorantly as on the part of any who have made or circulated the charge. It was being talked that this pastor was disseminating from the pulpit and in the homes objectionable doctrine concerning sanctification. There are those, of the ministry and the laity, who volunteered to inform me that this talk was without foundation. As these were in a position to know I suppose nothing would come of it. But when this minister was driven from the pastorate as a result of this talk I decided that I would exert myself to learn whether or not there was foundation for it. To this end I instituted search on both fields he had served as pastor. On one of these two fields I found absolutely no trace of any teaching in the homes or from the pulpit that was in the least objectionable. On the other field I found no one who had heard any objectionable teaching in the home, or had heard of any, or had heard of any body who had heard of any. The nearest to it was the fact—and I suppose it was an actual fact—that the preacher in question went on one occasion to a home where there were persons that were thought to lean toward sanctification. On this field it was said that there was one sermon that was objected to; but there are ear witnesses to the fact that this very sermon was he talk of the large congregation as being edifying and helpful, while only one or two so far as I could learn raised objection and one of these admitted that he was expecting beforehand to find something to object to.

I investigated in the first place that the man might have justice, whatever that could bring him or upon him, and secondly that we might save a worker or protect the work according to the facts found. I have made the matter thus prominent in this report that a man who it would seem has been victimized might be vindicated. It is the business of this Conference to protect the ecclesiastical character of its members just as it is the business of the national government to protect the person and property of its citizens. I have not given the name because I did not feel free to do so. But I am willing to insert the name by the consent of the party and by the wish of the Conference.

Our Situation. Because of a seeming threatened shortage of men—we have not had an actual shortage—and because of an insufficient support for our pastors some have thought our situation serious. But

if serious it is not hopeless. Any situation, no matter what, is not hopeless when it can be improved. Some of our number have dropped out or turned back. This is only history repeating itself. It has ever been so from the time of Gideon until now, that nuder certain tests or conditions some will turn back. The immediate effect of those who remain is that of depression. This effect, however, on brave hearts is only temporary. The permanent effect is to reveal the fact that there are among those who remain some that have the courage and the firmness to constitute a Gideon's band, ready and brave, each willing to do more than was supposed to be his part in order that the work may advance. Another fact in our situation is in that our pastors as a rule do not receive sufficient support. This is coming to be realized by our thoughtful laymen and keenly felt by our preachers. The preacher who has equipped himself and who does faithful work somehow comes to feel that he ought to be counted worth his "victuals and clothes," and the laymen do not disagree with him. It seems that our people are coming to realize that there is a connection between the meagerness of the support and the scarcity of men. It has been suggested that God is declining to call men and thrust them out to suffer. We know that God allows the heathen to go without the gospel until some body is willing to support a man to carry it to them. It may be that He is going to deal with us in the same way-let us go without the gospel until some body, we ourselves or some one else, is willing to support a man while he gives us the gospel.

This then is our situation, a seeming threatened shortage of men and a support not sufficient. That this is not as it should be is self evident. What to do about it, that is the question.

The Way Out. While there are hopeful facts in connection with our situation, it is not what we would have it, hence we need a way out into larger fields. We need a way. It is said, "Where there is a will there is a way." Perhaps it would be better for us to say, "Either we will find a way or we willmake one. Usually it is better to make a way than to find one. To find a way is to go up the hills, down the valleys, around the chasms, over the mountains; to make a way is to hew through the hills, fill up the valleys, bridge the chasms, tunnel the mountains, and the made way is better than the found way."

More Men. In making the way by which we are to be led out we must have more men. The fact that more men are needed suggests an encouraging fact. It means that we are doing more work, hence need more men. The business world today needs more men because it is doing more work. It has been said that "it is not more men the world needs but more man." But it now turns out that the world needs more men to do its larger work. So with our church. Our work is more extensive than formerly and also more intensive, hence the increased demand for men. Then, too, the thinning of the ranks by

death and the going away of some. This last I think is causing us to cast about as never before for men who ought to be preaching and are not. We seem now to be about ready to pray the "Lord of the harvest." During the last few months I have heard more concerning this than during all the preceding four and one half years. Let the church get upon her knees and pray the "Lord of the harvest," then get upon her feet and do her part toward answering the prayer. It is not our part to call men but it is our part to find men, find the men that God has called, find them by prayer and diligent search. It might be a good thing for us if we cannot too easily or at all supply all the fields from this Conference. It might be the means of sending us to our knees and then to our feet. Some times it has a happy effect to have to do a thing. Then again it is partly ours to make favorable the conditions under which God will call men, conditions under which they may be found when they are called. A deeper spiritual and a better support would improve the condition.

Pastors' Salaries. Again in making a way we must provide a better support. Perhaps it would surprise you to know that a large per cent. of our preachers, almost all in fact must have some other income than the salary paid by the church, in order that they may have a support. In many instances it means for the preacher to do something else part of the time than church work. What should the preacher do, what the layman? For the preachers to stand around in small groups of from two to four and each in turn declare his avowed purpose to quit if theq do not pay more, while all the other members of the group nod assent will not remedy the matter. Who is painfully conscious of difficulties to be overcome and endeavors to go away from the difficulties and to seek an easier place, such an one will not only never find a place to him easy but will never accomplish much in life. The man who finally has an easier place is not the man who goes away from difficulties but the man who overcomes difficulties. It is timid, not to say cowardly, to run away from a condition that ought to be improved. It is the act of a hero to improve such a condition.

The reason we do not have a better support is not because we do not have the resources, but because the resources have not been developed. It is the misfortune rather than the fault of our laymen that they do not afford us a better support. They, many of them, have not been developed. Our laymen are able to support us. Our laymen are willing to support us when they have been sufficiently taught, and they are willing to be taught. These two facts, the ability of our laymen and their willingness, constitute our resources. It is our part to develop the resources. This will be done, not by the magic touch of a fairy's wand, but by persistent, untiring effort, which effort must be prempted not by a desire for the comforts of life, but prompted by love for the cause and by a deep and abiding interest in the people we

are to develop. We may be much encouraged by the fact that a year ago "The Laymen's Movement" resulted in an increase of from 12 to 25 per cent. on not a few fields. Several fields have made a substantial increase for the coming year. I have letters from scores of laymen practically all approving of an advance movement in this matter.

This Conference should right early in the session appoint a committee to formulate and report to this Conference a plan for a vigorous campaign from now until the first quarterly conference, looking to an increase where the salary is yet too small. Our people are interested but the matter should be kept constantly before them until they act. If such a committee is created I would not dictate but suggest for its consideration that the plan provide where practical for a force of laymen throughout our district to help. That certain territory be given each layman, whose business it shall be to visit as many as practical of the churches in his territory and speak on the subject. This to create sentiment. Then visit in his territory all the quarterly conferences where an increase is needed with a view of inducing them to action.

Pastoral Service. Pastoral support and pastoral service are so mutually dependent that neither can be discussed fully without also considering the other. "The labourer is worthy of his hire. It also to be that the labourer is worth his hire. The pastor should put forth such effort in his pastorate as in the business world would be necessary to earn a comfortable living, or to hold his position in a line of promotion, or to make as success of any business enterprise. A layman, liberal and loyal else I would not quote him, said to me, "If some preachers were at other work and put forth no more effort than they now do they would not get a living out of it. The pastor who devotes only the fag-end of his time to the pastorate can rightfully expect only the fag-end of a salary." When we hear a pastor say his field owes him a living we intuitively feel as we do when we hear a person say the world owes him a living, "That depends on whether you earn it." It ought to be with preachers as with other people, if any will not work neither shall eat. A layman wrote me that he thinks a preacher ought to have a living from the church and not have to dig it out of the ground. But that layman thinks and every other thinking layman thinks that he ought to dig it out somewhere. The pastorate is not a sinecure. He is not a gentleman of leisure. The only way we can have short hours and easy work is by neglecting his work. preacher is exempt from some things, but he is not exempt from work. Some things are given to the preacher, but his salary should not be given to him.

Brethren of the laity and of the ministry, would we not all better recognize the ract that this matter has two sides to it, that of service and that of support. Let the preachers say, "We will serve you, you

support us." Let the laymen say, "We will support you, you serve us." So mote it be.

Our Finances. Our people are not fully developed in church finances. In many instances there is much yet to do. The hopeful facts are that we are working at it and making some improvement. We need to keep on working and keep on improving. And if we keep on working we will keep on improving. Our Ways and Means Committee makes a study of the subject. Let every pastor become a student of the subject, and at the same time a teacher of the subject, the people of his pastorate being his pupils. If the pastor will think, his people will think. If the people will think, they will also begin to act, some of them. If some of them begin to act with them.

As the pastor studies finances and as he teaches finances let him be ever mindful of the fact that the great end to be reached is not to collect money but to develop the people. The collecting of money is a means not at end. A broad-guage people, a big-soul people, a generous, open hearted people, hence a happy and prosperous people, that is the end to be gained. But let us also be thoroughly alive to the interests for which we collect money and have full realization of the fact that these interests are advanced only as we collect money for them.

Church Extension. Perhaps we as a Conference have not yet attach. ed sufficient importance to our Church Extension work. The pastor in collecting Church Extension funds should keep constantly in mind the fact that the prompt and regular payment of the salaries of some of his brother preachers depends to an extent on his faithfulness in collecting these funds. Let him work at this then as he thinks the stewards ought to work on his field at raising pastor's salary. Let us also keep constantly in mind the great fact that we now have an opportunity of a church lifetime to extend our borders, to get into the towns and establish ourselves there. The opportunity comes to us by the shifting of population and the building of the towns, but this will not continue indefinitely. This opportunity, like all opportunities and like most other things, can be saved only by using it. Opportunity does not make men but it reveals men; we may know and the next generation will know what sort of men we are by the way we use this opportunity.

Finally. Brethren of the Conference, as I come to say this last word to you in this capacity my inner experience is to me a peculiar one. To say I am glad of it would not express what I feel. To say I regret it would not express what I feel. To say there is a mingling of regret and of gladness would not express what I feel. I realize the force of the wisdom of a change. Without reluctance, without rejoicing, yet not without a sense of relief, I turn the work over to the leader this Conference selects, resolved that I will be as good a follower accord-

ing to my ability as he is a leader. I wish to acknowledge with gratitude the protecting care during these five years of our Heavenly Father. I wish to express my heart-felt appreciation of your confidence, your co-operation, your cordiality. My prayer is for your protection and guidance. To our beloved church I would say, "Behold, there shall be a day when the watchman upon the mountain top shall cry aloud: 'Arise ye, get ye up unto Mt. Zion, unto the Lord your God.' For thus saith the Lord: 'Fear not ye, O Israel, neither be thou still dismayed. Refrain thine voice from weeping, and thine eyes from tears, for I the Lord am with thee, and will save thee. I have loved thee with everlasting love and have redeemed thee.'"

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ORDINANCES.

The Methodist Protestant Church, together with nearly all Protestant denominations, recognizes the ordinances of the Lord's Supper, and of water Baptism. Our Saviour, before his death, instituted the supper, and commanded his followers, in its observance to commemorate his love and death until he come again.

This ordinance is of great importance to the church, and should not be neglected by any of its members. On some of our charges we fear this ordinance is not administered as often as it should be; perhaps not more than once or twice a year. Many church members do not avail thmeslves of the benefits of this sacred ordinance.

Jesus wept over Jerusalem, and doubtless if he was here now, he would be equally sorrowful, over the indifference and neglect of church members today.

We recommend that all our pastors explain more fully the design of this ordinance, and our obligation and privilege toward it, and urge their members to avail themselves of the spiritual benefit it brings to all who observe it according to the teaching of the word.

Baptism with water, is another church ordinance that ought not to be neglected, and all persons applying for membership in our churches should be baptised before they are received into full membership. Jesus said, "Go teach all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost." If this command is obeyed, children must be baptised as well as grown people, for they compose a large part of a nation. It is a glorious privilege parents have to dedicate their children to God and his service in the holy ordinance of aptism. By this act they put their children under his covenant care, and bring themselves under renewed obligations to bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

We recommend that our pastors teach the people on this subject, and set forth the obligation parents are under to thus dedicate their children to God.

TEMPERANCE.

There are few subjects that this Conference will have the privilege of considering that are more important than this one. Perhaps none more difficult to handle wisely This evil has existed so long and is so firmly entrenched behind appetite, greed and law that its removal is difficult indeed. When its progress is arrested in one form it makes its appearance in another.

Many of its forms are very insidious and stealthy at this time there is and enormous trade in bottled drinks, soft drinks or summer drinks, some of them may be harmless, but many of them contain alcohol or other drugs, the use of which is harmful, the excessive and indiscriminate indulgence in these drinks should be discouraged. While the ravages of intemperances are very great we are glad to note that the principles of temperance ar making progress. The victory for temperance in many of the recent elections is evidence of this.

A movement that will accomplish great good and should have our endorsement and fullest encouragement is the plan of having a temperance lesson every quarter in the Sunday-schools. Another important movement that should be emphasized and encouraged is the teaching in the common schools of the State the effect of alcohol and narcotics on physical nature.

Perhaps one of the most hopeful things to note is the fact that the good people of the State and Nation irrespective of politics or denomination are organized to overthrow the legalized saloon.

1st. We favor the Hepburn-Doliver bill or some other like measure, prohibiting license territory from shipping liquor into prohibition territory of any other State.

2nd. We favor State wide prohibition and pledge our prayerful and moral support to the Anti-Saloon League in bringing about this measure.

3rd. We oppose the return of the canteen, and petition all our rep-

resentatives at Washington to stand solidly against it.

We rejoice to learn that seventy of our ninety-eight counties do not license the traffic in any form, and that the other twenty-eight are fast falling into line.

Rev. R. L. Davis the State organizer of the Anti-Saloon League is present and we reocmmend that Conference grant him the privilege of laying before this body the purposes and plans of the organization he represents.

MEMOIRS OF REV. WALTER A. BUNCH.

Rev. Walter A. Bunch was born near Oak Ridge, N. C., March 15, 1846. His early advantages for an enducation were poor owing to the war then going on between the States. While yet in his boyhood ne professed religion and joined the Methodist Protestant church at Ai. He did not at once enter into the active work of the church, but pursuing his studies as best he could unde the deranged condition of the country, fitted himself for wider usefulness in after life. For some time he taught school in South Carolina, and doubtless during that time, having heard the call of God to a broader and deeper life, was, by close application making possible the larger life he was afterwards able to live.

He was licensed to preach on October 7, 1876, and at the Annual Conference of 1880 on December 6th ordained elder. Not being satis-

fied with his educational attainments and realizing the great demand for the trained mind, he continued his study and research, seeming to make a specialty of church law and logic.

At the Conference of 1885 he received his first work from the stationing authority and was assigned to Davidson Circuit. He remained in charge of this work for four years. At the Conference of 1889 he was elected President, and for four consecutive years traveled the district. Perhaps it is not too much to say of him that as a parliamentarian he has had few equals and no superiors in our church in North Carolina. As a preacher his style was forensic rather than exhortatory, and so convincing was his argument that his conclusions were rarely called in question even by the opposition. In the chair he was dignified, gentle and fair, and while his brethren sometimes differed from his views, later developments have proved that he was almost invariably right. He was anything but superficial, and the work he did was that which abides, and proves itself increasingly helpful as the years come and go.

At the Conference of 1893 he was sent to Burlington Station and served that charge 1894 and 1895. In November, 1895, he was elected President the second time, traveling the district for three years more, sometimes traveling nearly seven thousand miles in a year and writing over six hundred letters a year. We find nim pastor of Tabernacle Circuit 1899 and 1900 and on Orange in 1901. During the years 1902 and 1903 he was pastor of Asheboro station. Failing health forced him to retire for the years 1904, 1905 and 1906. At the Conference of 1906 he was assigned to Randleman Circuit. He at once entered upon the work and faithfully performed his duties till by declining health he was forced to take his bed, where, surrounded by his family and friends, on August 27, 1907, he closed his eyes on things of sense and time to open them again amid the paradisical splendors of the saints in glory.

Brother Bunch was married twice: First to Miss Emma Case, of Oak Ridge, N. C. To this union were born six children, four of whom are now living. After eleven years of happy wedded life he was called upon to stand by the open grave and see that loved form that had so often ministered to him in his conflicts and hours of depression, sink gently to her last resting place to await the resurrection morn.

On November 28, 1894, he was married to Miss Nannie Stafford, of Burlington, N. C. To them four children were born, three of whom survive him. About two years and a half ago he was again to pass through the deep waters of sore bereavement in the loss of his second wife, leaving him with three small children. Through all these sorrows and bereavements the same calm spirit that had so characterized his whole life was evident in all his bearings, and while the sorrows of earth bore so heavily upon him he confidently leaned upon the arm of God, and no word of complaint or murmurings escaped his lips.

He was an unassuming man, obtrusiveness being far from him, and while of a retiring disposition he had his convictions and the courage to make known his position, never compromising with any questionable doctrine or movement. In debate he was strong yet fair and ever ready to meet the issue out in the open. His foresight as to the possible outcome of any mooted question was at times wonderful, and with unusual tact and diplomacy he often forestalled some hurtful movement and with a masterly manipulation relieved his brethren from some difficulty into which they had unintentionally been placed.

But it was as a writer that perhaps he was able to make himself most clearly understood. He was concise, clear and logical, and the ease with which he took hold on and handled the most abstruse problems regarding matters of law and its application in detail at once stamped him a master in that line. In doctrine he was clear and safe, making no uncertain sound that might at any time lead the thought astray.

Among the last productions of his pen were a few articles on infant baptism published in Our Church Record, the last one of which is enough to put forever at rest the question as to his ability as a logically scriptural writer.

But Brother Bunch is no longer among us. The eye that so often glowed with fraternal light is closed; the voice that was so often heard in counsel is hushed; the heart that throbbed in kindly sympathy is still and the facile pen has fallen from his nerveless grasp. We have already missed him during the session of Conference; we shall miss him more as we journey further on down life's rugged road without his kindly aid, but as we look upon his vacant seat let us think of him not as one who with aching brow and wary step toiled on life's pathway, but as one the logic of whose ransomed spirit is love, and whose language is light, and whose ravished eyes are now beholding the panoramic splendors of our Father's glory where the flood tide of song is forever breaking in billows of praises at the Savior's feet.

OBITUARY OF REV. W. W. AMICK.

At the request of Bro. Amick's family and their pastor, I reluctantly undertake to perform the sad duty of writing this obituary.

William Wesley Amick, the son of Jacob and Barbara Amick, was born in Guilford county, N. C., June 7th, 1832. He was converted at Old Randolph M. E. church not far from his home in the year 1852 when he was 20 years of age, and afterwards joined the Methodist Protestant church at Liberty Grove church, near Liberty, N. C., where his membership remained until his death. He was married to Miss Mary R. Edwards, daughter of Sampson Edwards, h.sq., of Chatham

county, N. C., January 23rd, 1879, who, with three children survive him.

From the best information to be obtained at present, he travelled on the Granville circuit in 1862 or 1864. No Annual Conference Journal being accessible, and the printed minutes being meagre and imperfect, and having none of them prior to 1868 at hand, I cannot tell the different fields he traveled until 1870, when he was pastor of Randolph circuit; 1871 and 1872 there is no record in the printed minutes of the charge he served; 1873 he was assistant on Alamance circuit; 1874, there is no record, but the supposition is that he was in charge of Alamance circuit. About this time he joined the Annual Conference (having prior to this time traveled under appointment of the president- and was ordained, for in the minutes of 1875 I find his name recorded as a ministerial member of Conference. 1875, he was in charge of Alamance; 1876 and 177, Randolph; 1878 and 1879, Alamance; 1880, Randolph; 1881, Winston Station; 1882 and 1883, Orange; 1884, Greensboro circuit; 1885 and 1886, Randolph; 1887, 1888, 1889 and 1890, Alamance; 1891 left without work at his request; 1892 and 1893, Guilford; 1894, 1895, 1896 and 1897, Chatham; 1898, Gibsonville; 1899, 1900 and 1901, Saxapahaw; 1902 in the hands of the president; 1903 and 1904, Supernumerary on Liberty circuit; 1905 and 1906, Saxapahaw.

He was elected by his brethren a representative to the General Conference in Pittsburg, Pa., May, 1880, and also to the General Conference in Baltimore, Md., May, 1884.

For many years he was a member of the Superannuate Fund Society of the Conference and for about 12 years he was vice-president of the same, attending faithfully to the duties of said office until the last Annual Conference, when he resigned on account of his physical condition.

The last four years of his life his health was not good, so we find him in 1903 and 1904 a supernumerary on Liberty circuit; the Annual Conference gave him the same relation for 1905, but in the early part of that year, at the earnest solicitation of the President, he consented to take charge of Sarapahaw circuit which was without a pastor. He finished out the year and was re-appointed to the same work and served it as faithfully as his health would admit until Conference, when he wrote to the Conference and requested to be placed on the Superannuate list, which request was granted, but without any appropriation from the Superannuate fund being allowed him. He lived until the early morning of January 23, 1907, when he suddenly passed away, aged 74 years, 7 months and 16 days. He was buried the next day at Liberty Grove church, the funeral services being conducted by Rev. J. W. Frank, pastor of Liberty circuit, assisted by Revs. W. C. Kennett, W. M. Pike and the writer.

Bro. Amick's educational advantages were such as the common

schools of his youth afforded, and of course were limited; but he put to good use the education he obtained. From the best information I can obtain he was licensed to preach a short while after his conversion, and he began to travel when he was about 31 years of age, and soon became successful and popular as a preacher. I have heard him say he had 300 conversions and about 200 additions to the church the first year he traveled. Other years he was eminently successful in leading souls to Christ and building up the church. Nothing pleased him better than to be engaged in revival work. He was one of the most successful church builders in the Conference at any time of its history, having organized five Methodist Protestant churches and erected sixteen church buildings during a ministry of about forty-three years. And when there was a church to build or repair on his charge he would head the list of subscriptions with a subscription of from \$5.00 to \$50.00, thus showing his liberality to the church. His salary was generally small, sometimes less than \$200.00 and several persons dependent upon him for a support, but he was liberal. He was a hard worker and a zealous preacher. He was a hard worker at home on the farm, and now he is gone, he has left his family a good home. He preached hard when in the pulpit; in fact, he did everything with great earnestness. He did not rust out. "He was diligent in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord." He never declined going anywhere the Conference assigned him but once. As a preacher he was faithful and above the average in ability. His sermons were plain, practical and forcible. In all his long ministerial life he served but few charges which went to show his popularity where best known. Some charges he served all told ten years each, and some churches by change of boundaries he served longer, having in this way served Concord church on Saxapahaw circuit eighteen years. He was modest, retiring and unassuming. I never heard him attempt to make a speech in the Annual Conference. He let other brethren do that. Yet he was competent to make a good speech. He did not like so much speech making; he seemed to think it darkened counsel.

Bro. Amick was also a good man. I believe he enjoyed religion. His life of devotion to his family, to his church and to his Lord and Savior Jesus Christ is sufficient proof of it. His zeal in preaching the Gospel and in pleading with sinners to accept the Gospel is proof of it. His life and works are before us; we need no other testimony.

His wife and three children have lost their best earthly friend and the church and Conference in North Carolina one of their best and most faithful ministers. Peace to his ashes!

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Your committee on this department of church work desires to present the following report. Teaching the gospel in the Sabbath-school is a very important work and too much stress cannot be laid upon it. Those who are engaged in this work are character-builders. As a church we do not realize this truth and therefore do not emphasize the necessity of this great work a live Sunday-school mans a live church. It is through the Sunday-schools of the church that we must perpetuate our existence as a denomination. This being so the pastors should be the leaders and are by virtue of their office General Superintendent of each Sabbath-school. The pastor should make it his business to attend the Sabbath-school at each church on the day of his appointment. Some of our Sabbath-schools are doing a good work but our church as a whole is not doing much Sunday-school work. Last year all of the pastors in the district only reported (196) Sabbath-schools.

We ought to have as many schools as there are churches and as many more scholars than members. When we as a church realize the evangelistic force of the Sunday-school and that it is a part of the church we, as a denomination will take more interest in this branch of church work.

Therefore we recommend

- 1. That this Conference appoint a General Superintendent of the Sunday-schools of each Sub. District.
- 2. Each Quarterly Conference elect a circuit Superintendent and a Sunday-school convention be held on every circuit.
- 3. That delegates be elected to go to Sub. District conventions by each circuit convention.
- 4. That each Sub. District convention elect delegates to the State convention. Too little thought and attention is given this all-important work. Why is it that we have more work than workers? It is because our membership at some churches are not as much interested in this department of church work, as they should be.

We find that many of our families prefer a secular paper to our church paper. We insist that Our Church Record be the first paper in every Methodist Protestant family in North Carolina.

We therefore urge that each pastor and all others that are interested in our church strive to place it in every home and as far as possible one or more of our general organs viz: The Methodist Protestant and Methodist Recorder. We also insist on a more general circulation of The Woman's F. M. R.

We would call especial attention to the book recently published by our publishing house and written by Dr. T. H. Lewis, president of Western Maryland College,—Divine Credentials of the Bible—and would suggest that the pastors call atention to this magnificent work on all their charges.

COLLEGES.

The need of higher education is no longer a doubtful question. We all concede the desirability of an educated ministry and an intelligent laity. And denominational loyalty calls for an increased patronage of Methodist Protestant schools.

Western Maryland College, with a strong faculty and a three hundred thousand dollar plant, is especially fitted for producing splendid results, and is heartily commended to all who contemplate attending college.

Adrain College, Tehuacana College and Kansas City University are doing good work, and are worthy of our confidence and of at least our moral support.

Westminster Theological Seminary has closed its most prosperous year, sending out fifteen graduates. The faculty is composed of able and consecrated ministers. The degree course has been lengthened to three years and the non-degree course to four years. A new building has been erected in consequence of the increased patronage. The Seminary asks us to continue the assessment of three hundred dollars annually, which we should lay and then collect in full. Our Conference is also urged to encourage young men to accept the call to the ministry, and to avail themselves of both the college and seminary courses.

We advocate the maintenance of a number of first-class high schools in different sections, under the auspices of the Methodist Protestant Church. These will furnish candidates for matriculation in our colleges.

We recommend that Yadkin Collegiate Institute be retained as a high school, and that a Board of Directors, consisting of three resident members and two non-resident members, be appointed or elected by the Annual Conference, and empowered to select a principal. We heartily commend Yadkin Collegiate Institute and Denton High School to the patronage of our people.

To the Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church:

Your committee appointed to confer with Rev. J. F. McCulloch concerning the ownership of Our Church Record respectfully submits the following:

We believe that ultimately the Conference should own its organ and that the most feasible plan would be to have the title vested in the Publishing House, a corporation chartered for the purpose of publishing and disseminating the literature of the Church.

After a very thorough investigation, we are of the opinion that it would not be practicable for us to undertake to assume the ownership and the responsibility for the publication of the paper, at present. We do not have the funds in hand with which to purchase the outfit and we do not consider it advisable to go in debt to the extent which such a purchase would make necessary.

Furthermore, Our Church Record is being given to the church for about half the cost of printing and mailing it, according to the prices quoted by a leading Greensboro printer. Its publication is possible only because of the fact that the publisher has practical experience in this line of work, and because he prints in connection therewith a number of other periodicals.

Your committee, in connection with the trustees of the Publishing House, has decided that the best policy is to purchase gradually the outfit, consisting of an improved press, linotype machine, and other parts of the equipment, leaving the question of acquiring the title to our Church Paper, and assuming full responsibility for its publication, to some future time, when by mutual agreement between the publisher and the trustees, it shall be thought best for all the interests involved, for us to do so.

We would recommend that this Conference continue to give Our Church Record its unqualified endorsement, and that every member use its best efforts to increase the circulation. Our people need the paper in order that they may be informed concerning the work of the Church, and it is but just that we recognize the sacrifice the publisher is making in order that he may give it to us.

From the best information obtainable we believe that the pastors salaries have been more fully met than usual, and we are glad to report that there has been an increase in pastors salary by the last Quarterly Conferences that is worthy of special mention. We believe this is a mark, not only of financial, but of spiritual development. For this expression of interest on the part of our laymen, we tender our sincere thanks, and can assure them that, "The Liberal Soul Shall be Made Fat." Every pastor from whom we have heard recommend the individual apportionment plan for raising the pastor's salary, we therefore recommend it, and insist upon the use of it. We recommend that the following be read in, and adopted by the first Quarterly Con-

ference of each charge. Realizing that our pastor needs his money regularly as badly as other laborers that receive their pay weekly or monthly, and because he does not thus receive it he is often inconvenienced and sometimes embarrassed. Therefore be it resolved, that we will try to meet our obligations to our pastor monthly and insist that our stewards make every reasonable effort to do so. At the same time feeling that this will be the easiest way for us, and were we in his place nothing more than we would desire. Where a successful plan for collecting the General Interests is not already in operation, we, encouraged by the pastors who reported to us recommend the envelope plan recommended by our last annual Conference found on pages 37 and 38 of last year's minutes. We recommend that March be church Extension month, April Home Mission month, May Foreign Mission month, July Ministerial Education and Theological Seminary month, October for the rest. LIBERTY SCHOOL PROPOSITION.

As a substitute for the report of the committee to confer with certain brethren from Liberty, N. C., concerning their school proposition, we beg leave to submit the following:

Whereas, we heartily approve the spirit and zeal of our Brethren of Liberty, and desire to give them our moral support in th great work of education which, they so highly appreciate, and whereas we feel that it would be unwise to allow them to build hopes which might not reach fruition, or to depend on us for aid which the exegencies of the present crisis might not allow us to furnish.

Therefore, be it resolved that the thanks of the Conference be extended to the Brethren for their noble and generous offer, and that we request them to accept the following proposition:

That they donate the tract of 14 acres of land and \$2,000, and that the trustees are authorized to collect from the church in North Carolina, the sum of \$2,500 to supplement the Liberty High School fund in such way and at such time as they may see fit.

Seven trustees to be elected. Three by the Liberty people whose terms shall expin in one, two and three years respectively. Three by this Conference whose terms shall expire in four, five and six years respectively. The president of this Conference to be ex-officio chairman of the board of trustees.

This Conference shall elect all successors to the board as trustees.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

The great missionary, who came to earth nearly two thousand years ago, preaching the glorious gospel of the Fathers Kingdom commission ed His deciples to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature. Therefore if we would be Christs' we must be missionary in spirit, willing to go if God calls or to give of our means to support those whom God has called to this glorious work.

We believe every church and every Christian life should be thorougly missionary in spirit.

God has always blessed the church that was missionary in spirit.

The more missionary a church is, the greater are the blessing of the Divine Father upon it. If we would be a great church we must be great in missionary effort. An increase of effort means an increase of means.

We were much gratified to hear of the healthful condition, the ripened waiting harvest, the opened doors of the Foreign Fields as described in the eloquent addresses of Secretary Ogburn and our returned Missionary, Bro. Vandike.

We are glad to know that our missionary property, consisting of a college, night school and nine church buildings and four parsonages, worth about \$4,700 is in excellent condition. Recent improvements in the school buildings have increased their capacity to accommodate some 500 students. Scores of students have been converted and the Christian influences exerted by our educational work are of incalculable good. Our preaching force number 23, four missionaries and nineteen natives.

There are 12 organized churches with 1,100, and twenty-two Sunday-schools with 1,336 scholars. The increase in membership last year was about 30 per cent. The spiritual condition of the work in Japan is very encouraging. Revivals are reported from numerous mission-stations, and our church there is sharing in the general forward movement, moving gradually on. The chief occasions for concern is the home part of this work. That we at home shall contribute our reasonable proportion of the funds necessary to carry on the work inviting our workers in Japan.

We, your committee, in view of these conditions that each pastor should endeavor to raise the full assessment of his charge and as much more as possible.

We are delighted to note the marked growth in the woman's work and the inspiration that has come to our women through the faithful and efficient labors of our returned missionary, Miss Margaret M. Kuhns.

Our hearts were made to rejoice when told by Doctor Lucas, of the successes of our Home Missionary Board. Let us not forget this interest which is at our own doors. For we consider that our Foreign work is dependent upon the work of Home Missions and Church Extension.

We recommend that our pastors urge the importance of holding an Easter service in the interest of Home Missions, and a Children's Day service in interest of Foreign Missions in each church.

2. We would also recommend the circulation of the Home Mission Bulletin throughout our Conference and the hearty support of this Conference, to the Burean of Evangelism, and that we mention daily these interests in our prayers which are so dear to our hearts, also our

agents who are in the wisdom and by the guidance of God's Holy Spirit of laying this great work upon which the life of our church depends.



RULES OF ORDER FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE.

1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's Annual Report.

2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.

3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.

4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of the Scripture and prayer, under direction of the President.

5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.

6. It shall be the duty of the Chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal re-

flections or irrelevant debate.

- 7. The Chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.
- 8. All the committees shall be appointed by the Chair, unless otherwise ordered by the Conference.
- 9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
- 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.
- 11. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the Chair.

12. No member shall be permitted to speak more than once on any question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.

- 13. No person shall pass between the Chair and a member while speaking, nor interrupt the speaker, except by permission to explain.
- 14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud to disturb the Conference.
- 15. Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.
- 16. Members are requested to vote in all cases, except excused therefrom by the Conference.
- 17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.
- 18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.

19. All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on the main question.

20. All questions of order arising after the previous question

has been called for shall be decided without debate.

21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.

22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.

23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be call-

ed up again during the session.

- 25. No person shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.
 - 26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.
- 27. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.

PART II. REPORTS.

Report No. 1. THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, in Session, Liberty, N. C., Nov. 19th, 1908.

Dear Brethren—We are now assembled in the eighty-third session as an Annual Conference. Since we last met three of our members have passed into the great beyond. Last March Rev. C. A. Pickens was suddenly called from labor to reward, and during the following August Rev. G. W. Bowman and Rev. J. S. Dunn neard the call of the Master and passed out from among us.

They had each reached a ripe old age, and through the long years of service rendered, no suspicion attached to either of them. Each came "to his grave in a full age, like as a shock of corn cometh in his season."

Obituary committees have been appointed, and at the proper time will report, when a memorial service should be held.

Released and Appointed. Immediately after last conference Rev. W. P. Martin was released from Caldwell circuit, and assigned to Monroe circuit and Rev. H. D. Garmon was released from Monroe circuit and assigned to Caldwell circuit. At the last session of Conference, Albemarle, Orange, Chesterfield, Littleton and Winston circuits were left unsupplied. Rev. R. M. Andrews agreed to serve Orange in connection with Mebane charge, and was assigned to the work, Rev. J. H. Turner was induced to serve Chesterfield and has faithfully performed his duty till the sad accident in which his arm was broken. I am sure all his brethren have tenderly sympathized with him, and he has had our prayers.

In March Rev. Albert H. Bryans was assigned to Winston circuit, where, so far as I know, he has been doing his duty faithfully. In June Rev. R. C. Stubbins was assigned to Littleton circuit. Results indicate his efficiency, and his people seem to appreciate what he has been doing for them. Albemarle was supplied during the summed vacation by Rev. L. W. Gerringer, a student of Western Maryland College, and for one fourth of the year did what he could to keep our cause going in the extreme east. The Board of Church Extension apportioned two hundred dollars to supplement the salary of the pastor on Albemarle. As brother Gerringer served that charge one fourth of the year, I would suggest that fifty dollars of the two hundred be paid brother Gerringer. In July, at his own request, Rev. Wm. Porter was released from Burlington Station and Rev. J. H. Abernathy was assigned to said charge, where he began

Sept. 1st, and has been giving the work his undivided attention till now. Thus all the charges have been supplied though some of

them for only part of the year.

Our Pressing Needs. It is true that our church is moving forward, and there are many encouraging evidences of our growth, yet it is equally clear that we need more money, especially for the work of Church Extension. From many parts of the state there are calls coming to us to enter new fields, but for lack of funds we have to decline at least for the present, to enter them. Some of the best charges we have are among those once needing and receiving help from the Board of Church Extension, while others equally promising are open to us, but we are not prepared to enter them now. Cornelius, about two miles north of Davidson College, is one point that might be mentioned. Here we have quite a number of loyal Methodist Protestants, with others likely to move to this growing town, which would constitute a very hopeful beginning. Rockwell and Bethel, both of which used to be on the Mecklenburg circuit, and Alexander's Chapel on the Fairfield work have all become so weak from deaths, removals, etc. that neither offers ground for hope of development nor even to hold them at what they are at present. It is thought by some that it would be better to sell these and invest where there is a greater probability of success. Doubtless there will be some propositions coming before this Conference from the people at Cornelius, which I am sure we cannot afford to let pass.

Some Changes Needed. Winston and Forsyth circuits are entirely too large and it seems they cannot be developed as they now stand. The Boundary Committee will no doubt consider these needs at the proper time. Doubtless other changes may be asked for, and if men can be had to fill the new places made, I am sure the Boundary Committee will favorably consider them all.

More Men. There are two reasons why there is a seeming lack of men. I use the word "seeming" advisedly. One is, some old men may not like to conform to new methods, and another is that some young people do not rightly appreciate the counsels of the old. But we do not have to wait till we get to Heaven to realize that a preparation is necessary for a preparation, and that a preparation requires a preparation in that with which it comes in contact, but we find that condition right here now. Hence the great need for a prepared ministry, for the people are being better prepared every year, and unless the ministry is prepared to meet the changed condition of the time, then the church must suffer accordingly. The Revelation of a thousand years ago was the same we have, but it did not reveal to the people of that time what it does to the consecrated men of to-day, for the reason the world was not prepared as it is to-day.

Our Work in Western North Carolina. Whatever may be said of the central and eastern part of North Carolina, west of the Blue Ridge is in a state of rapid transition, and possibly changes there are more pronounced and rapid than elsewhere in the state. Our work in Asheville has, perhaps, developed under the tireless energy of brother Williams more rapidly than the most sanguine among its friends had dared to hope, and yet it is but in its beginning. It deserves the warmest support of every Methodist Protestant in the state. Weaverville, eight miles to the north of Asheville, is a promising point and while there have lived in the town some Methodist Protestants for a long while, there has been no Methodist Protestant church there save Clark's Chapel, some distance out. The few Methodist Protestants in Weaverville are trying hard to build a church but are not able to build such a house as the times and place demand. An electric car line is graded to within a very little distance of this attractive little town, and doubtless when this is done, the population will greatly increase and the northern people seeking the "Land of the Sky" for health, will go on to Weaverville instead of stopping in Asheville. For these and other reasons, the Board of Church Extension should favorably consider this point and endeavor to help these struggling Methodist Protestants who are trying to prepare for the expected developments that seem almost sure to come in the near future. In Weaverville we have a fine lot on which a neat church is in course of building and when completed it will be a credit to the town and a joy to our people there. While we are bound to take care of all we now have we should be ready to enter other open doors.

Grace Church on Monroe circuit, of which your Executive had something to say in his report at last Conference, is yet in an unsettled state. It seems that one of the Trustees, who happened to have the keys of the church, becoming dissatisfied for some reason. which I do not know, locked the door against the pastor of Monroe circuit of which said church was one appointment and that the dissatisfied Trustee invited the preacher of another denomination to preach regularly in the church, which I am told he has done during the present year. Many of the Methodist Protestants, not wishing to be denied the privilege of worshiping as Methodist Protestants, have gone over to the denomination referred to, leaving those remaining too weak as they claim to enter and maintain a suit for the recovery of the church. I am also informed that the denomination above mentioned, has elected a Board of Trustees who claim to hold the church in trust for the use of the invading denomination. These are the facts as they have come to me, and as I learned them when on the work. It would be a great relief if the Conference would take some action that would settle the matter one way or the other, and the sooner this is done the better for all parties concerned.

Our Educational Outlook. Yadkin College High School is doing good work, and considering the financial depression, is doing better work than formerly. Denton High School, which through the generosity of a few brethren, is a new acquisition to our denomination, is doing good work, and has a hopeful future. But some of us feel that this is not enough, and there may be a proposition coming before this Conference that will merit the prayerful consideration of every member of this body as well as every Methodist Protestant in the state. It seems to some that we are about at, if we have not already come to, the parting of the ways, and the losses we have sustained in the past because of a lack of educational advantages for our young people, are small compared to those we must confront, if we do not make good the opportunities of the hour; for it is true that "There is a tide in the affairs of men, which taken at its flood, leads on to fortune" and if let pass must lead the other way.

During the year I have visited every charge and every church of every charge save seven. From two of these I was kept away by high water, two by storms prevailing at the hour of service, two by the neglect or oversight of the pastor and one at which there was no appointment made. At some of the churches I have tried to preach twice and three times.

Our Church Literature. It is painful to see the indifference many show toward our church papers. In many homes where two and sometimes three secular papers are taken, and by those too who claim to be Methodist Protestants and not a solitary religious paper to be found in the home. It is said that where there is a will there is a way. There is no intention to criticise any one for reading secular papers, but for those claiming to be Methodist Protestants to studiously, or otherwise, decline to take a single Methodist Protestant periodical is very little short of a crime against themselves and their children. What we read and hear determines in a large measure what we think, what we think has much to do with what we say and what we say to-day will go very far towards determining what we do to-morrow. It is believed by many in a position to know, that light scurrilous literature is doing more to debauch the young mind to-day than even its victims are willing to admit. Our own periodicals are as good as money, experience, intelligence and devotion to duty can make them, and most assuredly merit a liberal patronage of all our people. We have in our own Conference, Our Church Record as a local organ, and as general church organs The Methodist Protestant and the Methodist Recorder, and for our young people, especially, The New Guide. At least

one of these, and if possible all of them, should be in every Methodist Protestant home. Tennyson said: "I am a part of all that I have seen," and if it be true, surely we must be a part of all that we have read.

Ministerial Support. During the twenty years just passed, the average cost of our churches has increased 93 per cent. Contributions to Foreign Missions 479 per cent, Home Missions 206 per cent, Church Extension 864 per cent, while the average salary paid pastors has increased but 22 per cent. Now, it is admitted by all who have taken the trouble to test matters, that the cost of living during the fifteen years just passed has increased from 33 to 40 per cent and many instances much more. Many of our laymen, if asked how the pastor gets along on so small a salary, will confess they do not know.

The foregoing estimates are not intended to deter any from contributing liberally to the General Interests of the church, but rejoicing in that we have done so well, determine to do more because of better advantages and more opportunities, and at the same time to bring the pastor's salary up to the level of other lines of church work. To be sure we ought to do none the less of the one but more of the other.

Cc-operation of Laymen with Pastors. It is refreshing to know that in a large majority of cases the laymen are ever ready to fall in line with the pastor and co-operate with him in accomplishing those ends for which he has been called to the pastorate. In a few instances there are found those who seem to disregard law almost altogether, if at any time it does not harmonize with a local notion that may be the result of local prejudice or wrong training. Every organization must have some one at the head, even down to where there are two or more working together for the accomplishment of one purpose. It is clear that if the pastor who is supposed to be at the head of the charge he serves does not have co-operation of the entire membership he can not hope to do the work that even the charge itself has a right to expect at his hands, were he but free from the embarrassments that entangle him in the execution of his plans.

Church Union. At our last General Conference there were propositions made to us coming from the Methodist Episcopal Church, looking toward church union. Their overture was responded to by a commission sent to them by our General Conference for that purpose. The commission sent by our General Conference was composed of loyal Methodist Protestants of unquestioned intelligence. Just here I must take the liberty to quote a paragraph from an editorial in The Methodist Protestant of September 30, 1908:

"The propositions for union with the Methodist Episcopal

Church are now especially in the minds of our people, in so far as they are interested in union at all. This our General Conference committed to a commission, which shall meet similar commissions from other bodies of Methodism. Now, until this does something the question of union is not before the church. If the commission fails to secure a favorable action for union, it will not be before the church at all, and therefore all discussion now is not only premature, but fruitless, and useless, except as it necessarily agitates the church, and in that event discussion is harmful.''

The above is so much better said than I could possibly say it, is my only apology for taking the liberties I have. I would strongly commend the foregoing paragraph to the calm consideration of this body as well as to all our people at large.

Our Out-Look. The fact that we have made progress under adverse circumstances as those of the past is proof that now when conditions are better, we not only have reason to be grateful, but to take courage and press on to greater achievements than those of the past. And, too, not only the work done in the past but the expectations of the future are well calculated to inspire us with brighter hopes. We have better churches and more of them, a better prepared people worshiping in them, by far a better class of parsonages and a better equipped ministry in them than we had before, and more young men preparing for work in the North Carolina District than we have heretofore had. As our people increase in intelligence they naturally improve in liberality and benevolence.

Some material improvements made during the year:

The people of Yarboro circuit during the year have built a parsonage costing somewhere between four and five thousand dollars. Also put five hundred dollars improvements on Harmony church. Roanoke circuit has greatly improved their parsonage at a cost of something like one thousand dollars. High Point has spent something like two thousand dollars on improving the church at that place. Other charges spending from twenty-five to nearly sixteen hundred dollars on parsonages during the year are as follows: Greenville, fifteen hundred and seventy dollars; High Point, twenty-five dollars; Uwharrie, fifteen dollars; Halifax, sixty-five dol-Concord, one hundred and twenty dollars; Lebanon, one hundred and fifty-five dollars; and Spring Church, five hundred dollars. On improving and building churches reported: La Grange, seventy dollars; Denton, two hundred and fifty dollars; Greenville, three hundred and twenty-seven dollars; Rockingham, three hundred and fifty dollars; Uwharrie, one thousand and ten dollars; Winston circuit, ninety dollars; Concord, one thousand dollars; Graham and Haw River, eight hundred dollars, with possibly some not reported.

Thus, while the financial depression has been sorely felt, our pas-

tors have been faithful and the people liberal, and I am sure that any apparant decrease in collections must be due more to panical times than unfaithfulness of the pastors or a lack of liberality on the part of the church.

And finally, with gratitude to almighty God for his providential care over us during this Conference year, and for bringing us together in another Annual Conference, thanking the ministry and laity throughout the District for their uniform kindness to me, and praying the richest blessings of our heavenly Father upon all and the deliberations of this body, I am,

Report No. 8. COLLEGES.

We are pleased to note the continued prosperity of the different institutions of our church.

With appreciation we recognize the most excellent services rendered our church in North Carolina by our college at Western Maryland and we commend it to our people as being worthy of our most loyal support and should receive our continued patronage.

Kansas City University, Adrian College, and Tehuacana College are all growing into greater usefulness and power and are helping to shape the destiny of our church, not only in their respective sections, but that of the church at large, and we rejoice in their prosperity.

We are pleased to state that Westminster Theological Seminary is in a flourishing condition. The new building has been reared and finished at a cost of \$7,500. The course of study has been lengthened one year, which now requires three years for college graduates and four years for non-collegians. Thirty-three students have registered and more are expected next term, making the enrollment the largest in the history of the institution. Our conference has three students: R. F. Troxler, E. F. Caudle, and H. M. Neece. We recommend that an earnest effort be made to raise the assessment in full, that pastors lay the claims of the ministry upon godly and promising young men, and that our churches engage in special prayer that the Lord of the harvest call more laborers into the harvest.

Denton High School, the generous gift of a few individuals to our church, has adopted a full college preparatory course of study and is doing an excellent work, and we recommend it to the patronage of our people.

Yadkin Collegiate Institute which has done a good work for the church in the past, is still doing good work and we commend it to our people as a worthy school.

We recommend that in event this conference favors the establishment of a College in this state that a committee be appointed to confer with Bro. O. R. Cox concerning the Thomasville Female College property, and report not later than 1:30 this P. M.

Report No. 15. COMMITTEE ON ORDINANCES.

Your Committee finds nothing essentially new to report, but regrets to note a condition which has been existing for quite a time, viz., a laxity in many places in the observance of the ordinances. There seems to be, in some places, a lack of conviction as to the value of ordinances, and, consequently, a tendency to ignore, or discard, them altogether. Some desiring to become members of the church without being baptized, while others, who are already members, neglect, or refuse, to take the communion. While the baptism of infants is almost wholly neglected, ignored, or antagonized in some places. This is to be deplored. While ordinances have in themselves no saving efficacy, yet they were instituted and designed by God as teachers, by type, figure, and symbol, of great, living, vital, fundamental facts, or truths, a kind of objectlesson method of teaching. So the ordinances are not savers but teachers. And a failure to recognize this fact, in our efforts to get away from the superstitions of popery, we have gone to the other extremes of indifference, neglect, or actual antagonism.

Many Christians, not Methodists, however, have made the mistake that the Jews made, of resting in the ordinances for salvation. While the other extreme, which has already been noted, is the ignoring of them altogether. The middle ground of recognizing them as methods of teaching, and incidentally as means of grace, seems to be the true, simple, safe, Bible ground.

It seems that the ministry is largely responsible for these conditions. We have failed, to a large extent, to teach the people, either from the pulpit, at the fireside, or by the dissemination of literature on the subject; so that in many places about all that our people hear on the subject, is from those who hold views entirely at variance with our own. So we need not be surprised when some want to join us without being baptized at all; and others insist on "going down into the water, and in coming up straightway out of the water;" and others fail to have their children dedicated to God in baptism; and others fail to take the communion through indifference, or superstitious notions about it.

Therefore, we recommend that our pastors instruct the people on this subject from the pulpit, by the fireside, and by the dissemination of sound books, pamphlets, and tracts on these subjects, as occasion may demand. There seems to be more or less demand everywhere, especially on the part of the young, as persons are no more born with theological and ecclesiastical knowledge, because their parents know these things, than they are born with mathematical knowledge.

Item 4. Our work in western North Carolina. We recommend that this be referred to our Board of Church Extension for their most careful and most prayerful consideration, and we beg to insist that our people give this western North Carolina work their best possible support.

Item 5. Our educational outlook. We recommend that this be referred to the Committee on Colleges.

Item 6. "Our Church Literature." We recommend that this item be referred to the Committee on Literature, but would urge that our pastors exert themselves to induce each family to take at least one of our periodicals.

Item 7. "Ministerial Support." Upon this item your committee begs to submit that the Laymen's Movement that it now on foot in so many churches and must find a very prominent place in our church life must and will have a very favorable bearing on this subject, and we most chartily recommend that this movement if encouraged

will bring about between the clergy and the laity a better understanding of this subject.

Item 8. "Church Union." Your committee approves the Presi-

dent's recommendation in regard to church union.

"The Outlook." Your committee is greatly pleased with the progress of the past year and are very much gratified to note the splendid outlook for our church as shown by the President's Report.

We heartily endorse all other items and subjects of the report.

Report No. 22. COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Missions submit the following report.

Ever since Jesus said, "Go ye into all lands and preach the Gospel," it has been the duty of all Christians to be a going power for the kingdom. Jesus said, "If ye love me ye will keep my commandments," and it is just as imperative to go as a blessing for Christ as it is to come to Christ for a blessing. No life can remain a Christ-filled life that does not overflow in blessings to others, no church can remain a power and a blessing to itself and community unless it reaches out and becomes a blessing to other communities and countries.

The recognition of this fact has led to the organization of the Laymen's Forward Movement for Foreign Missions. Through this organization the laymen of different denominations are making an intelligent study of the subject of missions and are contributing larger sums than was ever thought possible before men and women were made intelligent on the results of the workers on mission fields and the great opportunities of the work and the still greater needs of these fields.

Our own church has not measured up to her opportunities, but as she has become intelligent in regard to this great work she has moved forward and we believe that with knowledge and information she would stand second to none. As individual workers we Methodist Protestants allow none to stand in front of us in the

battle for the Lord Jesus Christ, and with proper information we as a church would be in the forefront of the battle.

Our laymen are are liberal, as sympathetic, and as able, on the average, as those of any other denomination. We therefore urge our pastors to take steps to bring facts and information on this subject before our people. We most heartily endorse and recommend the suggestion of Brothers Queen, Klein, and Hubbell that mission study classes be organized in the churches and Sundayschools, and we believe that we shall have it fully demonstrated that "knowledge is power."

We commend heartily the work of the women of our churches. They are pursuing a good course by organizing missionary societies, both home and foreign, and studying the needs of the world, and contributing intelligently to those needs. The addresses given by Miss Sutton and Mrs. Gray were full of just the information we need, and we recommend that the pastors and delegates representing charges here co-operate with the secretaries of these boards and open the way for them to bring these helpful, tho sad truths before our people.

And right in this connection stands our church extension work. Our hearts were made sad by the great deficit that this board found it necessary to report to this Conference, and we recommend that strenuous efforts be made by the pastors who have deficits on their charges this year to meet in full the Church Extension assessment next year and thereby prevent the embarrassment of presenting a deficit to the preachers and laymen who are present at the Annual Conference, and we further urge the delegates, when they return to their charges, to co-operate with their pastors in raising the assessment in full.

Report No. 23. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Methodist Protestant Church in North Carolina does not realize that the success and perpetuation of its existence as a denomination depends to a very great extent on its Sunday schools. Neither do we comprehend the soul-saving possibilities of the Sabbath school. We should as pastors and people take more interest in this department of church work.

In the Sunday school we have a vineyard in which to work for "Christ and the Church." In view of these facts we recommend that every school in the district be requested to observe Rally and

Decision Day services suggested by the secretary of our young people's work. That we request all our Sunday schools to make a Christmas offering for Church Extension, in accordance with the recommendation of the Board of Church Extension, this offering to be taken at a Christmas service, or in the regular Sunday-school session, or in whatever service the pastor and the Sunday-school workers of the respective churches may deem best.

That we request the Board of Church Extension to prepare a form of Christmas service to aid the Sunday-schools in carrying out the above request, provided said Board shall deem the neces-

sarv expense involved shall be justifiable.

That each school be requested to use "our own" literature. We most earnestly commend the books "Training for Service" and "The Unfolding Life" to the superintendents and teachers of our schools, which can be secured at Adrian, Michigan, from Rev. C. H. Hubbell. We also recommend that each pastor attend the Sabbath schools on his work when it is possible to do so. That each quarterly conference elect a circuit superintendent who shall visit all the schools on the circuit and impress upon them the importance of this work.

Report No. 24. COMMITTEE TO PREPARE AN OBITUARY OF THE REV. G. W. BOWMAN.

The Rev. George Washington Bowman was born March 9, 1827, and after an earthly sojourn of nearly 80 years peacefully entered the heavenly rest August 3, 1908. For 65 years he had been a faithful member of the Methodist Protestant Church, for 57 years a licensed preacher and for 29 years he had been a member of this Conference—excepting two short intervals of transference to the unstationed list at his own request. He served Guilford, Rowan, and Alamance circuits as pastor and was supernumerary on his home circuits when not assigned to pastoral charges.

Bro. Bowman was first married to Miss Martha Jane Kime, July 3, 1851, with whom he lived very happily until her death, December 24, 1890. To this marriage six children were born, all of whom save one—yet living—preceded their father to the spirit world after brief but promising lives of useful and honorable service in the M. P. Church. His second marriage was to Mrs. Mary Wilson, in 1892, with whom and with whose children he and his children lived in perfect peace until her death in 1903.

In some obituaries the eulogies sincerely recorded by loving friends need to be modified by honest readers, the extravagant terms sometimes employed not being always fully justified by the It has been the aim of this committee to faithfully record here such facts as show Bro. Bowman's real character. We know nothing—we have heard of nothing—in his life and conduct that needs extenuation. He seems to us to have been without reproach and above suspicion. His whole life from his unusually serious, thoughtful and studious boyhood to his ripe, mellow old age appears absolutely unblemished and stainless. This is testified to by a reliable life-long neighbor and friend. All who knew him well had the fullest confidence in his integrity. He tried to "do right in everything." This was his religion. "He let right guide his daily actions." A few years ago, when asked why he did not more largely advertise a sale he made, he replied: "I did not want any one to think I had overdrawn or exaggerated in regard to anything."

Though so very practical in his views and conduct he vet possessed a remarkably metaphysical and philosophical turn of mind. None that ever heard one of his profoundly simply addresses on the essential character of the Christian religion can easily forget it. We were astonished at his doctrine; he made it so plain, as reaching up and grasping the highest truths he simplified them to our level and set them in order before our eyes. His sermon published in Our Church Record shortly before his death is a sample of his strong thinking, clear expression and logical acumen. Many a college graduate might well envy the preaching ability here displayed by this plain man, not favored with the training of the schools, but, taught of God in His Word and in nature—in the fields and woods, in books and running brooks. Where did he ever acquire such a classical style and learn to reason so powerfully? A lady hearing him preach on the Holy Spirit one hot Sunday afternoon was greatly surprised at his clear understanding and presentation of his subject, and came away painfully impressed with her own comparative ignorance. And many will remember how gifted he was, how graceful and "at home" in administering the Lord's Supper. Hearts would burn with love and eves would melt to tears as this grand old scribe, "instructed unto the kingdom of God," would "bring forth out of his treasury things new and old" concerning the wondrous love of God. "He was the most spiritually-minded man I ever knew. He simply breathed an atmosphere not known to others." Thus writes one who knew him well. This deep spirituality may account largely for his preaching power.

The communities in which Bro. Bowman lived were all greatly blessed by his hearty co-operation with the pastors under whom he was supernumerary and his excellent work in Sunday-schools and prayer meetings. And young pastors always found him a kind and wise counselor and sympathizing friend.

After four weeks of very severe suffering, borne with the sweetest, unmurmuring patience and submission, he lingered for two days as if in the very article of death. Then, on Sunday morning, August 3d, after several efforts to speak, he said: "I have passed through the new dispensation and the Lord has welcomed me in." Then with a smile of joy, his hands upraised as in praise, he laid his head in Jesus' bosom and slept.

Report No. 25. OBITUARY OF REV. JOE S. DUNN.

Rev. Joe S. Dunn was born in Elizabeth City, Va., April 14, 1836. While he was yet an infant the family moved to Fayetteville, N. C., where he grew up. He was converted in 1853 and began to preach about four years later. Just prior to the Civil War the family moved to Randolph County and lived about ten miles south of Asheboro. Bro. Dunn was licensed to preach on Asheboro Circuit, Poplar Springs Church, now extinct, his membership being at Dunn's Cross Roads.

He enlisted as a private soldier in the Civil War and arose to the rank of lieutenant.

At Enfield he joined the Conference Nov. 8, 1865, was ordained Deacon along with Bro. W. C. Hammer in 1866 at Salem Church, now Saxapahaw Circuit. The Conference of 1868 at Mt. Pleasant, now Liberty Circuit, ordained him Elder, along with Bros. W. C. Hammer and Isaac Hunt.

The following is his ministerial record: 1865 and 1866, Monroe Circuit; 1867, Stanley Mission; 1868, Mocksville Circuit; 1869, Yadkin Circuit; 1870, Greensboro Circuit; 1871, Buncombe; 1872, Mecklenburg; 1873, 4, and 5, Stanley; 1876, could find no record as report of the Stationing Committee was not recorded with other proceedings; 1877, Davidson; 1878 and 9, in the Western North Carolina Conference without work at his own request; 1880, in the hands of the President; 1881, without work at his own request; 1882, in the hands of the President; 1883, supernumerary it seems on Stanley; 1884, name not mentioned in the report of the Statioing Committee; 1885 and 6, in the hands of the President; 1887, page three of Minutes, "withdrawn." The committee is inclined to think this means that he was transferred to the unstationed list. 1888, 89, 90, 91, we find no mention of his name. But in the President's report of 1892 is recorded the fact that during the preceding year he was assigned pastor of the Milledgeville Church after it had been detached from the Davidson Circuit. 1892 and 3, Monroe Circuit. From 1894 to 1907, either in the hands of the President each year or without work at his own request.

During the Conference year just closed he was called to his reward. Bro. Dunn was loyal to the church and to the cause. He was ever ready to speak a word for the Master and to do all he could to extend His kingdom in the world and to propagate the church he loved to the end. While he was one of the oldest members of the Conference, the younger members recall with what regularity and faithfulness he continued to meet with us in annual session, and the interest he continued to manifest in the business of the church.

Report No. 26. MEMOIR OF REV. C. A. PICKENS.

Christly Andrew Pickens, the subject of this memoir, was born at Weaverville, Buncombe County, N. C., Feb. 24, 1824. He was born and reared in a godly home and in an eminently religious commuity. His mother, Caroline Weaver Pickens, was a pious, faithful woman, and his father, Rev. Andrew Pickens, for nearly half a century, was a useful minister in the M. E. Church, South, and then he became a member and minister in the M. P. Church. His older brother, Robert Pickens, was an itinerant minister in the M. E. Church, South, and under the circumstances it is not surprising that in his early manhood he gave his heart and life to the service of God.

He was converted at the age of 20 years and joined the M. E. Church, South. In 1853 he withdrew from the M. E. Church and joined the M. P. Church at Mt. Zion, which was the first church of that denomination organized west of the Blue Ridge in North Carolina, and is still a part of Buncombe Circuit.

He was licensed to preach in 1856. His marriage to Miss Sophina Dillingham, of Buncombe County, occurred on April 4, 1854. This marriage was happy and harmonious, and she was indeed a true helpmeet in every sense. He attributed much of his success in life to her, and often spoke of her many virtues.

After he was licensed to preach he worked as unstationed preacher for about eight years, keeping up a number of regular appointments, and devoted as much time to the work as circumstances would allow.

In his boyhood he took advantage of the best educational facili-

ties at his command. He attended the district free schools in his neighborhood, and later on went to Tennessee, and attended an academy six months and a high school five months. After this he returned to North Carolina and taught school two years before

entering on his life work.

He began this work when circuits were very large, and when to be a "circuit rider" meant toil, labor, travel, and privation. But he spent the best years of his life in this great work of the ininerant ministry. He served the following charges, viz.: 1864, Buncombe Circuit, part of the year; 1865 and 66, Cleveland; 1867, Tar River; 1868-70, Halifax; 1871-74, Winston; 1875-79, Haw River; 1880-81, Mocksville; 1882-83, Mecklenburg; 1884, Cedar Falls; 1886-87, Flat Rock; 1889, Littleton; 1890-91. 1893, Burlington Mission; 1894, Davidson; 1895-96, Orange: Guilford: 1897, Mecklenburg: 1898, Lexington and Shiloh; 1899, Richland, part of the year, filling out the work after the death of the lamented Dr. Lineberry. In 1885, 1888 and 1892, he was left without appointment at his request. He served on the Winston Circuit five years, and the same on Haw River Circuit, being the first member of the Conference to serve one charge consecutively this long, after the limitation of four years was removed.

In 1872 he maved his family to Yadkin College for the purpose of educating his son, his daughter being educated in the Asheville Female College. He interested himself very much in the success of Yadkin College, and always gave to it his loyal support. No doubt many of the former students remember with grateful hearts his fatherly counsel and loving advice, and the help he gave them.

In 1875 his heart was made very sore by the untimely death of his only daughter Emma, a lovely and accomplished girl just blooming into womanhood, and it may be this sore was not fully healed while he lived.

Then again in July, 1897, while the family lived in Lexington, a more sad and heart-breaking bereavement came upon him in the death of his wife, the fond, loving companion of his youth. From this time he was depressed in heart, and his health seemed to fail gradually, until the Conference of 1899, when he retired from the active work and the following year went to make his home with his son and wife in Lexington, removing with them to High Point about two years before his death.

Bro. Pickens in his life work was intimately connected with and linked to the pioneers of Methodist Protestantism in North Carolina in the formative period of the church, and devoted the best years of his life and strength to its advancement. He was among the last of the old pioneers, who by their noble sacrifices and untiring labors paved the way for better things for the pres-

ent generation, who owe to them a lasting debt which can never be paid.

Bro. Pickens, as is known, was a good preacher, and in his manner and preparation of his sermons was very original, and he preached with great earnestness and fervor.

His daughter-in-law, with whom he lived and in whose home he died, and who knew him so well, says in his obituary published in Our Church Record: "Possessed of a bright, happy disposition, his genial nature endeared him to all with whom he came in contact. He looked on the sunny side of life and added much to the happiness of others by his humorous stories, for which he was proverbial.

A great lover of little children, his chief delight in his latter years was his grand-children, to whom he was devotedly attached. He had great faith in his fellowmen, always showing the charity that "thinketh no evil," and believing that the good in us all far outweighs the bad. His gentle kindness to the erring was one great secret of his power to draw men to God.

"His faith in God and His Word and promises was absolute. and his daily walk was in obedience to the precepts of the Bible. I have often been struck with the certainty of his belief, and I am sure that he never was perplexed by doubts, as most of us are prone to be.

"In early years he was especially gifted in song, and drew many to Jesus by his wonderful voice in the old time camp-meetings and revivals. His services as an exhorter and helper in these meetings were always eagerly sought by other ministers. He was an ideal pastor, his genial, kindly nature making him welcome in every home.

"About four years before his death he suffered a partial stroke of paralysis, from which he never fully recovered. His speech was affected, and it was a source of much sorrow to him that he could not preach as in the olden days. On Tuesday, March 3, 1908, after eating his usual hearty breakfast, he and his little three-year-old grandson went to spend the day with his friend, Rev. J. H. Moton, and he was in excellent spirits all day. While returning home, he was taken ill on the street, and was brought home on a buggy. About thirty minutes after reaching his room, without pain, and with scarcely a struggle, the gentle spirit went back to God who gave it. I can but think he would have preferred it so, no lingering illness, no weary suffering, no care for loved ones. It was a fitting close to a well-spent life. During the day, in the midst of buoyant health and spirits, and as the evening shadows lengthened, he walked with God, and was not, for God took him. The sweet influence of his godly life will long be a benediction in our home, where he is sadly missed.

"He leaves us a priceless heritage, the memory of a life beautiful in its devotion to the service of the Master. May his grandchildren emulate his noble example.

"We took his body back to Shiloh, near Lexington, and in the old church yard, on the hill, tenderly laid it to rest by the side of the

faithful love of his youth."

We shall miss Bro. Pickens in our Conference here, but we shall hope to meet him in the great conference of love, in the Father's home above.



WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE.

The financial problem is one that is still unsolved and your committee is at a loss to know what to offer to this Conference. We believe that many good resolutions have been offered by your committee and passed by the Conference, and yet these resolutions have been largely ignored by our pastors and people. Our dear Savior loves a cheerful and liberal giver, and many precious promises are vouchsafed to those that practice cheerful liberality. We believe that no charge ought to be considered in good standing that does not fulfill its obligations, and that preference in pastoral supply should be given to those circuits that meet their obligations.

We urgently insist upon the apportionment plan for pastor's salary and general interests, and that the amounts be sent to each member early in the year.

We urge that every reasonable means be used to pay the pastor monthly. This is much better for the member, and is essential that the pastor may not be embarassed, and in order that he may do his best work. We recommend either the card or envelope for notifying the members of their apportionment. We recommend that March be Church Extension month, April Home Missions, May Foreign Missions, July Ministerial Education and Theological Seminary, October for the rest. We recommend that the assessments be as follows:





RULES OF ORDER FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE.

1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's Annual Report.

2. At 3 o'clock p.m., on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.

3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.

4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of the Scripture and prayer, under direction of the President.

5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.

6. It shall be the duty of the Chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflections or irrelevant debate.

7. The Chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.

8. All the committees shall be appointed by the Chair, unless otherwise ordered by the Conference.

9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair,

10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.

11. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the Chair.

12. No member shall be allowed to speak more than once on any question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.

13. No person shall pass between the Chair and a member while speaking, nor interrupt the speaker, except by permission to explain.

14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud to disturb the Conference.

15. Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.

16. Members are requested to vote in all cases, except excused therefrom by the Conference.

17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.

18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.

19. All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on the main question.

20. All questions of order arising after the previous ques-

tion has been called for shall be decided without debate.

21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.

22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.

23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be-

called up again during the session.

25. No person shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.

26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.

27. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.

On motion the Secretary was authorized to answer the letter, assuring the Asheboro people of our appreciation of their interest, and to say to them that we do not deem it best at this time to make any propositions, but if they have any propositions to make to the Conference regarding a school, we shall be glad to have them submit such propositions to our committee appointed to receive all such propositions.

The Committee on Ways and Means made its report. The report was amended and adopted. See Report No. 22.

The report of the Conference Faculty was read and approved.

See Report No. 23.

The report of the Committee to nominate Jr. C. E. Superin-

tendents and C. E. Presidents for the different Sub-Districts was submitted and adopted. See Report No. 24.

Motion, that our President be sent to the meeting of the Executive Committee of the General Conference next year, passed.

On motion the Stationing Committee read its report. The report was adopted. See Report No. 25.

At the request of Rev. C. H. Whitaker the Conference excused him from his appointment.

On motion the Conference adjourned with prayer by the President, Rev. W. E. Swain, D.D., to meet in Kernersville, N. C., Thursday, Nov. 17th, 1910, at ten o'clock.

PART II. REPORTS.

Report No. 1. PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, Randleman, N. C., Nov. 18, 1909.

Dear Brethren: We have now assembled in the eighty-fourth session as an Annual Conference. Since we last met, one of the fathers in Israel has gone from among us, and his place is now vacant.

On September 6, 10:30 P. M., the noble spirit of Rev. W. C. Hammer took its flight to the realms beyond. A committee on obituaries has been appointed and at the proper time will re-

port, when a memorial service should be held.

Released and Appointed. Soon after last Conference, on account of sickness in his family, Rev. H. S. B. Thompson asked to be released from Saxapahaw circuit, which request was granted, and Rev. J. H. Bowman was assigned to the work, where he has been giving entire satisfaction till now. Haw River was left unsupplied. C. A. Cecil began March 1.

Rev. Geo. E. Hunt asked the last session to release him from serving Winston Mission, and soon after Conference, Rev. J. L. Giles was assigned to that charge, to which work he has given

his whole time till leaving for this Conference.

Rev. P. L. Jordan was assigned to Chesterfield Circuit by the last session of Conference, but on account of other engagements he could not serve, and Rev. J. H. Turner has been filling most of the appointments during the year; Rev. H. W. Braswell fill-

ing a few appointments toward the last of the year.

Rev. W. C. Kennett kindly consented to fill the appointments on Chatham Circuit until Rev. C. W. Bates, the pastor assigned by this Conference, should finish his college course. Brother Bates came to the work about the middle of June and remained till about the middle of September. Since then Bro. Kennett has again been filling the appointments.

I would suggest that the exact time each served the charge be ascertained and that each be paid his proportion of the one hundred and fifty dollars allowed to that charge by the Board of Church Extension.

Fairfield Circuit was left unsupplied by last Conference and your Executive has been unable to find a man to take the work during the year. This is very much regretted, and it is hoped that this Conference can find some way to supply this charge during the coming year. Alexander's Chapel of the Fairfield Circuit was sold early in the year and the money has been put at interest. The door at Cornelius is still open, but there are indications that it may soon close. If possible, something ought to be done to relieve the anxiety and revive the hope of those good poeple there.

All the charges have been visited during the year except Caldwell, and that would have been but for the hurried trip to Asheville in obedience to the order of the Board of Church Extension. All the churches in the District, including those in South Caro-

lina and Virginia, have been visited save four.

In all cases, except those mentioned above, the pastors entered upon their work immediately after last Conference and have been faithful in the discharge of all their official duties. No taint of indiscretion or immorality has attached to any one of them, and the year has been of unusual revival interest. At some points where it was thought of selling the property, glorious revivals have been held and life and activity has been restored. Notably among these are Mt. Pleasant and Flint Hill on the Uwharrie Circuit.

The Need of the Hour. The need of more money for the prosecution of the work of the church has been repeatedly emphasized, and, to be sure, conditions have justified all that has been said; but just now, though money is as necessary as ever, the crying need of the hour is more and better prepared men for the ministry. From many points come calls for men, among them North Charlotte and Emporia, Va., with sufficient reason to believe that, could the right man be found, his support would be forthcoming. Whether it be better or worse than the older plan, I shall not attempt to say, but it is a day when things are being done on the intensive system. The work of the church is to meet conditions as they are, not as they were or as they will be, hence the wisdom of smaller fields better cultivated.

Some Hopeful Indications. During the year just closing, the revival spirit seems to have been more pronounced than for several years past. Congregation have, perhaps, been above the average. Very much material improvement has been made despite the financial depression of the year. In July a committee from the Board of Church Extension met the Executive Committee of the Board of Home Missions in the city of Asheville, and arrangements were made by which the Board of Home Missions agreed to appropriate ten thousand dollars toward building a church in Asheville when the Conference should have rais-

ed a like sum in good pledges and cash. If anything further has been done it has not come to my attention.

The church at Weaverville has been very largely improved, and a new one built at Clark's Chapel, on the Buncombe work. A very nice church has been begun on the Littleton charge, but as to how near completed I do not know.

High Point has made decided improvements in the Sunday-

school room at a cost of \$3,000.00.

Mt. Carmel on Granville entirely rebuilt at a cost of \$1,200.00. Pinnacle on Pinnacle and Mt. Zion charge has been beautified and otherwise improved. Mt. Zion is also undergoing very material repairs, building a tower and recess pulpit, etc.

Shady Grove on Tabernacle Ct. has taken on new life and been

greatly improved.

Haw River on the Graham and Haw River work has been painted and is a very commodious and up-to-date church.

A parsonage has been bought at Reidsville for the Haw River

Circuit.

But possibly to Gray's Chapel belongs the palm, all things considered. The pastor has been tireless and the people, or a goodly number of them, have done exceedingly well. This is one of the very best country churches, if not the best, in the North Carolina District.

Our Schools. Yadkin Collegiate Institue has had a larger attendance during the fall term than usual and the work is moving on better than for some years past. There are some repairs needed here, which, if not made soon the building must suffer greatly. So pressing are the needs that if something is not soon done the building must be abandoned to its fate. In consideration of what has been possible at this place in the past it seems something should be done to restore it to its former place and power. As to whether this can be done under the changed conditions of today there is not time here to discuss. I feel it binding upon me to call the attention of this body to conditions as they are, and then leave the matter to your judgment as to what is best to do.

Denton High School is overcrowded and still others wanting to come. The principal informs me that for four or five hundred dollars he could nearly double the working room of this school. It, too, deserves the hearty endorsement and help of this body and

all our people throughout the state.

But beyond all this our people are looking to this Conference for some action looking toward a higher institution of learning. As to whether this is the proper time to launch an undertaking of this sort I do not undertake to say, but the people at large are not only expecting but are anxiously waiting for this Conference to take some decided steps toward a college. There may come before this Conference propositions that it is hoped will not be

lightly brushed aside nor hurriedly turned down.

Our Church Literature. The editor of Our Church Record informs me that the circulation of that paper has stood about the same for several years. This ought not so to be. That paper ought to have a wider circulation each year. The Methodist Protestant, published in Baltimore, is one of the very best religious journals issued in the country, and ought to have a place in every Methodist Protestant home. Indeed, it is difficult for some of us to understand how a Methodist Protestant can be really intelligent regarding the work of the church in the state and nation without reading both these papers. It is evident that there is much profitable work left undone, not so much because our people are averse to doing when they know, but because, failing to read our church papers, they do not know. As a matter of course one who is ignorant of a fact cannot see the importance of that fact. While it is believed all our pastors have been faithful in the discharge of this duty, it is not amiss to urge that each double his diligence along this line.

It should not be forgotten that The Methodist Recorder, published in Pittsburg, Pa., gives the church news of the great north west and contains much valuable information. In this, the day of rapid transitions, character is largely formed by reading. It is therefore binding upon all to read the best to be had. To fail to do because one fails to know, when to know was possible, is a crime. We cannot afford to plead ignorance, for the opportunity

to know is, in large measure, enjoyed by all.

Ministerial Support. It is hardly fair to judge the liberality of some charges by the amounts paid in pastors' salaries during the past two or three years, for the hand of financial depression has been heavy upon some. Possibly all has not been done that might have been and those who have failed to do their best have cheated themselves more than others. It is wholly unfair to charge the pastor with failure when the people decline to respond to his appeals. One way to make a poor pastor a good one is support him with the presence, prayers and purse of the people. Having the ability and failing to put anything in the church and then expect to derive any spiritual benefit therefrom is as unreasonable as to expect one's checks to be continually honored at the bank without ever making a deposit. It is gratifying to note that our people are growing in benevolence, and clap-trap methods for raising money for religious purposes are becoming less popular each year, and it is hoped that the time is not far distant when, as a matter of business, our people, from the least to the greatest, will regard their church vows as binding. I would suggest that our people read the church vow at least once a quarter. The high compliment paid the North Carolina Conference by the editor of the Methodist Protestant on Nov. 10 would have been impossible but for the unselfishness and liberality of those who have gone before us, making possible a higher plane on which it is our privilege to stand.

The Outlook. This depends largely upon what we make it. It is ours to succeed or fail. We have a better educated ministry, a better qualified laity, we are stronger in the centers of population, we have better churches, better publishing houses, better parsonages and more of them, better schools and more pupils in them, and, consequently, a stronger church and more for it to do. What has been done is but the beginning.

"Men, my brothers, men the workers, ever reaping something

That which we have done is but the earnest of the things that we shall do.",

The highest ideal the church can set for itself, and one it ought to set, the general good of all and in that general good the glory of God. If the church has not for its final consummation the subordination of all material things to the glory of God, then the church has no place on earth. It is ours to see that "Christ is all and in all" and to make sacred the secular by employing secular things as sacred trust. And now permit me to return to my brethren in the ministry and to the laity throughout the entire District my sincere thanks for the help and encouragement they have given, without which it were impossible for one to travel over the territory as large as this Conference has now become.

And now, with grateful hearts to Almighty God for His goodness and mercy to us all during the year, we come again to report our year's work and plan for the future. Let us not be afraid to undertake large things for Him and may the Divine Spirit guide us in all our deliberations here.

Report No. 6. COMMITTEE TO PUBLISH CONFERENCE JOURNAL FOR 1908.

Report No. 7. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The success of the Methodist Protestant Church depends largely upon the success of its Sunday schools. The latest statistics of the Protestant churches show that the greater per cent. of members received into the church come from the Sunday schools. So it is necessary that we who desire the success of our own church must give this work our special attention.

We make the following recommendations: That the banner

school campaign which has been inaugurated by the Board of

Young People's Work be introduced into all the schools.

That we give attention to the five points mentioned in bulletin issued by the Board of Young People's Work that are to be gained, which are as follows:

1. A ten per cent. increase in the enrollment of each school.

- 2. Gifts from the Sunday-school to both our home and foreign missionary boards.
- 3. A teacher-training class in existence or newly organized during the year.
 - 4. At least one organized adult Bible class in the school.
 - 5. A school offering for the Board of Young People's Work.

These conditions are neither numerous nor difficult. They are in the reach of any school that will pray and plan and push. Their realization will be an immense help to the local school and church as well as to our denomination at large.

That the schools take advantage of the helps sent free of charge by the Board of Young People's Work for organizing adults Bible classes and Cradle Roll.

That Rally Day be observed by the schools and an offering be made for the Board of Young People's Work.

That Conference Board of Young People's Work be continued.

Report Number 8. COMMITTEE ON PASTORAL WORK.

Fireside preaching is oftentimes more effectual than from the pulpit. In your pastoral work do not seek the level of your people, but bring them up to your standard. The preacher who is loved by his people is a good preacher and his people will not

love him unless he visits them. Unless he studies his church register.

Your committee recommend that our pastors do more pastoral work the coming year than we have ever done in view of the evangelistic movement of 1910.

Report Number 10. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

We, your committee, appointed to consider the communication of Dr. M. L. Jennings, Editor of The Methodist Recorder, relative to a campaign of evangelism throughout the M. P. Church with the slogan, "Twenty-five thousand souls added to the M. P. Church," feel that the N. C. Conference should officially ally itself with this general forward movement looking to the salvation of souls and the strengthening of our denomination. In its incipiency our church had a rally cry that inspired and united our people of every section. Mutual rights and the right of private judgment have triumphed. Again, we need a rally cry to bring our entire denomination into a more intimate working relation, and to stir up the eagle's nest that we may soar into a more stimulating atmosphere. In a strenuous campaign of evangelism the church and workers will be renewed by reflex action.

We recommend that the pastors constitute themselves their own evangelists, beginning their activities in that line early in the year, rather than relying solely on one week of special effort; though the special meeting will be needed as the harvest time; and the help of a brother pastor will still be helpful. Preaching to merely fill appointments is as formalistic with some of us as a slavish following of an elaborate ritual. Without affectation let us at every service have a loving aim to win hard hearts, try to wring penitential tears from indifferent eyes. As yet, and perhaps for all time to come, we can not look to the professional evangelist to an appreciable degree to accomplish the work contemplated in this resolution.

Report Number 12. COMMITTEE ON COLLEGES.

Our growth and efficiency as a church will in a large measure be in proportion to the interest we manifesi to the education of our children and to the lovalty we show toward our church institutions. We cannot hope to succeed if we prove recreant to either duty.

In Western Maryland College we have an institution of which we are justly proud. It has grown to such proportions and such is its equipment and high standard of excellence that it commends itself to us for our hearty endorsement and loyal and liberal support.

We recommend that our people co-operate with Bro. Pritchard, a student of this institution, who expects to be with us some time this year, in soliciting patronage, and, also, funds to be used for such special purpose as may be directed by the college authorities.

It gives us pleasure to report that the Westminster Theological Seminary has entered upon its banner year, the enrollment being the largest in its history, thirty-eight having registered already, and more expected.

The lengthening of the course of study and the entrance of a constantly increasing number of college graduates are making possible a better equipped ministry than ever before.

Three North Carolina students are in the Seminary and one

more may enter in January.

The Board of Ministerial Education reports that hereafter no appropriation will be made to any applicant who will not promise to return to his own Conference and apply for work therein, unless permitted by the Conference to cast his lot elsewhere.

The Board also reports that their funds have been so well han-

dled that not a dollar has ever been lost by investment.

There is need for more men for the ministry and more money for their training.

We recommend the same assessments as last year.

Kansas City University and Adrian College are doing good work for their respective sections of the West and Northwest and our whole church is indebted to them for the great and noble work they are accomplishing.

Denton High School is now the largest in its history. Seventysix boarding students with six counties represented mark a growth that should be gratifying to the church and all connected with the institution. The school now has departments of music, art, business, besides the regular college preparatory course, which admits to any of our colleges and to the State University.

Yadkin Collegiate Institute is doing good work. of pupils is growing larger. There are this year nine in the senior class. The Christian status of the students is very high. The most of them will lead in prayer.

We acknowledge with due appreciation the generous bequest of our late much beloved Brother J. C. Roberts of \$10,000 to be used

in our Conference for educational purposes.

Our people are not going to be satisfied until at least a strenuous effort has been made to establish a Conference school of high grade. We have nothing at this time to recommend as to when and how this shall be done; but it is a time when with earnest, sincere prayer we invoke the directing guidance of the Holy Spirit that He may guide us and lead us in an enterprise so vast and vital.

Report No. 14. COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Our Conference as a body and our membership generally believe heartily in Foreign Missions, and by various resolutions and reports of the past we stand clearly committed and fully pledged to this great enterprise of the church. And we rejoice in the gradual increase of our interest in the work as evidenced in our larger contributions year after year. Yet we must admit, with sincere sorrow, that we are not yet measuring up to the demands of the work, the general average of denominational contributions, or our ability to support the cause. We would therefore urge—

1. That by every practicable means available, we strive to educate and inspire our people to greater efforts to obey our Lord's last command. Pastors, by faithful preaching on the subject, by recommending and circulating Foreign Missionary literature and by calling attention publicly to the articles appearing on the subject from time to time in our church papers, can

greatly further the above proposed end.

2. Your committee would also move that our Conference officially endorse the Laymen's Missionary Movement—a movement now three years old, conducted by laymen of different denominations, whose object is, by enlisting the zeal, the business sense and the liberality of laymen, to bring about the evangelization of the world in this generation. The Executive Committee of this Movemnt, headed by the Hon. Samuel B. Capen, of Boston, is now conducting a campaign of city visitation covering seventy-five of the great cities of the United States. One of the seventy-five meetings is appointed for Greensboro—the only one to be

held in our State—January 12-14, 1910. It is hoped that more than a thousand laymen will attend this meeting, and your Committee believe that every charge in our Conference should send at least one layman as a delegate. Full particulars may be obtained by application to the Hon. A. M. Scales, Greensboro, N. C.

Through Rev. F. C. Klein, the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer of our Board of Foreign Missions, we are favored with the following statistics of the Japan Mission Conference: organized churches, 11, one of which is entirely self-supporting, some of the others partially so; members 1114, 183 of whom were baptized last year; Sunday schools, 32, with 2470 scholars; preaching force, 4 missionaries, 10 ordained Japanese, and 15 preachers,—29 in all; educational institutions, 2—Nagova College, with 17 teachers and 300 students, and the Yokohama Night School, with 7 teachers and 200 students. Our school work in Japan is so economically administered that our 2 schools with 24 teachers and 500 students annually cost the Board only \$5,010.50. The College has a Y. M. C. A., whose members preach at night to hundreds of people on the streets, and 40 of the students recently expressed their purpose to become Christians; and this is the only Christian College in a territory of 3,000,000 people. The Japan members gave last year to the mission work \$1,357.00, or \$1.20 a member. Owing to the unavoidable removal to and fro of several missionaries, the Board has had unusually heavy financial burdens, and much needed improvements in our church and school facilities in Japan demand and should receive our increasing support.

We recommend the apportionment to our various charges of the \$2250.00 assessed upon our Conference by the Board of Foreign Missions to be raised, whenever practicable, exclusive of the Children's Day offering.

We would heartily record our very great pleasure in the presence and address of Rev. F. C. Klein, the Secy.-Treas. of our Board of Foreign Missions, and pledge our sympathy and cooperation with him in his arduous and faithful labors.

Home Missions. In the Home Mission Department of the Church we learn of the growth and development which has resulted from the labors of our Home missionaries.

We rejoice in the fact of a small percentage of increase in the receipts of the Board, yet this increase is not adequate to meet the increased demands made upon the church by the opportunities in new fields.

We note with pleasure the fact that the mission stations have contributed to the church as much as they have received from the Conferences by direct assessment.

Another encouraging feature of the home mission work is that the Evangelistic Bureau and the work of the missionaries have resulted in about 1400 conversions and we commend this forward movement by the Board in behalf of Evangelism.

We rejoice that the Board has been able to take up work in new fields. We note with pleasure the decision of the Board of Home Missions along with our Conference to do a larger work in Asheville. We commend the faithful labors of the pastor of Asheville where we have a membership of 101 and a Sunday school whose average for a whole year has been 139.

We urge the Conference to rally to the support of the work

in Asheville, believing it to be a strategic center.

We commend the Mission Study Classes to our pastors and churches, believing it to be the imperative duty of all Christians to inform themselves as to the progress of missions in both home and foreign lands., that they may pray for, and give to, these great enterprises of the Kingdom.

We believe our Conference ought to make a more determined effort to raise our assessments for missions in full, and urge

all pastors and laymen to cooperate toward this result.

We commend the Easter service as one of the most effective means of teaching our people the meaning of Easter as well as informing and inspiring them in behalf of missions in the home land.

We rejoice that there is such an increased demand for the service, and urge the Board to give us the best service it can prepare. We urge our pastors and superintendents to send for this service, which will be furnished them free of cost, and that the offerings be sent to the Board additional to the regular assessment. We also believe that there is an increased demand for more information, and we urge the Board of Home Missions to prepare leaflets and if possible, a history of our own home mission work, that our people may be better informed, believing that increased knowledge will mean both enlarged interest and giving.

Dr. C. L. Queen, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Home Missions, is present with us, and we heartly endorse the

work he is accomplishing for the Board.

We commend the work of the Woman's Board of Home Missions. The officers of the North Carolina Branch of this Board are: Mrs. A. G. Dixon, president; Mrs. Emma B. Siler, vice-president; Mrs. T. M. Johnson, secretary pro tem.; Mrs. W. C. Hammer, Jr., corresponding secretary; Miss Virla Coble, treasurer.

We commend also the undertakings of the Woman's Board of

Foreign Missions. Its officers are: Mrs. Dr. Joy Glascock, president; Miss Jessie Rowe Williams,, secretary; Mrs. W. C. Hammer, Jr., corresponding secretary; Miss Velna McCulloch, treasurer.

Your Committee would very gladly report more fully concerning the work of our noble women's societies, could we now obtain the facts necessary.

Report Number 19. COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to report as follows: In viewing the State as a field, as we see our situation today, our cause is suffering because of inactivity on the part of its friends, and this inactivity is due to the fact that many people

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feel that the work is finished when the law prohibiting the manu-

facture and sale of intoxicating liquor is passed.

We find in our State that there is a small percent. of citizens who will not regard the law prohibiting the manufacture and sale of liquor and that there is a much larger percent, who will encourage this lawless set, and will aid and abet them to the extent of buying their stuff, hence we see the importance of taking part in our elections, endeavoring to elect Christian men who will enforce the law. We are in co-operation with Bro. R. L. Davis, superintendent of the North Carolina Anti-Saloon League, and we agree with him when he said that we need further legislation in our State to abolish the near-beer joint and limit the amount of liquor that one can have in his possession, with a search and seizure clause attached, giving officers the right to raid suspicious places; also national legislation to destroy the jug trade, which does violence to the principle of State's rights and doctrines of democracy.

We urge our law-making bodies to so amend the law that clubs

will not be allowed the use of intoxicating liquors.

We are opposed to federal license in dry territory.

We favor a national anti-jug law.

We will not give our support to newspapers which help in any way the sale of intoxicating drinks.

We are opposed to the sale and use of near-beer, and it is the sense of this Conference that we should help in every way that we can the great cause of temperance.

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REV. WILLIAM CLARKSON HAMMER.

William Clarkson Hammer, son of John Hammer and Jane Spoon Hammer, was born Dec. 13, 1836, and died Sept. 6, 1909; aged 72 years, 8 months and 24 days. In 1859 he was married to Miss Hannah Jane Burrow, to whom were born eight children, all of whom are now living, except the first one, who died in her third year. After the death of his first wife, he married Miss Sarah Simpson, of Guilford Co., on Nov. 10, 1884. She survives him. There are also five brothers and a sister, who, with his seven living children, mourn his decease.

Bro. Hammer's death occurred in Asheboro, where he had lived several years, and his funeral services were in the Methodist Protestant Church there, conducted by the Rev. W. E. Swain, President of the N. C. Conference, assisted by the Rev. T. M. Johnson, of Asheboro, and the Rev. A. G. Dixon, of High Point, all three of whom made brief and appropriate remarks. The choir sang, "Abide With Me," and "Asleep in Jesus." The burial services were at Brower's Chapel, a church built under his supervision and largely by his own hands, and near which for nearly twenty-five years he had lived and reared his family.

Bro. Hammer's early life, a few years of which he lived in Tennessee, were spent in teaching, farming, surveying, and working as a carpenter. He was remarkably industrious. He could not be long unemployed. And his bright, strong mind was even more active than his powerful body. From his youth to the week before he died, he devoted all the time he could command to the study of useful subjects, reading thoughtfully the Bible and such other great books as he could obtain; so that he acquired a remarkable knowledge of history, ancient and modern, sacred and profane; and he was unusually well informed and wide awake concerning the leading questions of the day.

When about 22 years of age, Bro. Hammer having heard the call of God, began to preach the gospel as opportunity was found. In 1868 he joined the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, in whose employ he continued active throughout his life, as health and circumstances permitted. The following is the record of his pastoral work year by year: 1869, Monroe and Mecklenburg; 1870, Monroe; 1871-72, Guilford; 1873, Asheboro; 1874-7, supernumerary on Asheboro; 1878, Carraway; 1878-80, Davidson; 1882-90, supernumerary on Cedar Falls; 1891, pastor Cedar Falls; 1892, Stanley; 1893-6, Surry; 1897-9, Guilford; 1900-01, Uwharrie; 1902, Lebanon; 1903-05, Richland; 1906, Albemarle; 1907-09, superannuated.

He was author of two religious pamphlets, "Plain Words to Stir up Our Minds" and "A Help in Worship for the Individual and Family." Bro. Hammer was an all-round good man. Hissteady, consistent life exemplified and beautified the homely virtues, and the gentler graces softened and refined his rugged manliness; and so "strength and beauty were in the sanctuary" of his heart, in which he enshrined "holiness to God" and enthroned Jesus as King. The ruggedness and strength of his character and personality were like the great towering mountains. But within those mountains and nestling quietly far below their snow-capped peaks were pleasant valleys with singing birds and beautiful flowers and luscious fruits and murmuring brooks and broad fields of waving grain. Rarely has a plain exterior ever concealed or revealed a more beautiful interior, or a more loving, gentle and tender heart beat in the bosom of a plain, manly man. those who knew him best loved him most. He could bear acquaintance; he improved on acquaintance. As a citizen, he was patriotic and law-abiding. As a neighbor, he was kind, honest and peaceable. As a friend he was true and sympathizing. As a Christian he was loval to Christ and his cause. As a pastor, he was faithful and prudent. As a preacher he was sound in faith, exalting Christ as the Son of God and man's only and all-sufficient Savior, and fearlessly yet loving declaring all the counsel of God. In his home life he was loving, gentle and kind, pure as the driven snow and true as the needle to the pole.

"Your fathers, where are they? and the prophets, do they live forever?" Not here; but there, they live forever with Jesus their Redeemer. And our dear Brother Hammer has now joined

their throng.

"Thus star by star declines,

Till all are passed away, As morning high and higher shines

To pure and perfect day.

Nor sink those stars in empty night;

They hide themselves in heaven's own light."

Bro. Hammer was a brave, true soldier of the Cross. The poet immortalizes those who fell on a bloody field:

"Gashed with horrible scars,

Low in glory's lap they lie; Though they fell, they fell like stars,

Streaming splendor through the sky."

We verily believe our dear Brother Hammer having fought a good fight shall wear the crown of righteousness, and we hope to meet him in glory. Earth is poorer for his absence, but heaven is richer for his presence. After a strenuous life of faithful toil, how his soul, freed from earth's limitations, must revel rapturously in the illimitable yet restful activities of the spiritual world! His life and labors and influence have enriched and made better our Conference and church and the communities where he lived; and

perhaps hundreds of souls, many of whom were converted under his ministry, feel sweetly drawn heavenward by his strong and gentle attractions.

Farewell, dear brother. We reverently lay this poor, withering wreath on thy grave, and turn away with an earthly sorrow

soothed by the eternal hope.

MR. JOHN CALVIN ROBERTS.

Mr. Roberts was to me an ideal character—everywhere and always the highest type of a Christian gentleman. I was for some time associated with him in Sunday-school work, in which he excelled—being a model Sunday-school superintendent, always faithful and punctual. He made the work very pleasant for his teachers. As an evidence of his thoughtfulness, I have known him in the absence of a teacher to say to the class kind words, commending the work of the teacher, thus encouraging the class, strengthening the influence, and endorsing the work of the teacher.

But, it was in his home life—which is the crucial test of any life -that he displayed the most admirable qualities of mind and heart. My husband and I, with our son-then a babe-spent a very happy year in Mr. Roberts' home. During which time, I was brought into daily contact with Mr. Roberts. I think he was without exception the most equable tempered person I have ever known. During my entire acquaintance with him. I never saw him when his equilibrium was the slightest particle disturbed. Never did he seem impatient or irritable, never worried or annoyed, but always gentle, patient, and kind, having the most tranquil countenance I have ever beheld. It was restful and soothing to look into his noble, peaceful face—and looking at him one was unconsciously led to think of the Master whom he served, and of the world beyond. His tender, courtly, chivalrous devotion to his delicate wife was part of his daily life, always thoughtful of her comfort and pleasure, ever ready to minister to her in every way. Her vision was defective, and he was eyes to her. Often and often have I seen him sit by her side and read and re-read the Sundayschool lesson to her, till she was perfectly familiar with it; for she, as well as he, was a regular attendant at Sunday-school as long as her health admitted, and he was invaluable to her in learning the lesson, which she always carefully prepared. Besides

reading to her, he assisted in many of her household duties. She did not use a sewing machine, and could with difficulty see how to thread a needle, yet she did a little sewing at times. She has many times shown me dozens of needles that he had threaded, in order that she might use them when she wished.

Of his cordial, generous hospitality in his home I need hardly

speak, for so many have shared and enjoyed it.

Another trait of his, not confined to his home life, that always impressed me, was his perfect sincerity. I think Mr. Roberts never exaggerated, never embellished any statement, never deviated from the plain truth at any time.

The mournful intelligence of the late John Calvin Roberts has doubtless saddened the hearts of all those who knew him. This is written in reverence of his memory and attainments as a true law-abiding citizen.

He was not an orator, yet a very effective speaker. His character and force displayed themselves in his Sunday-school talks, no one however great did other than cherish the words he uttered about the Master. He always addressed the reason and not the passions of his hearers.

He cultivated but few of the light graces of life; always simple, plain and direct in his modes of habit and thought. His many acts

of kindness fell as the dews of heaven unseen and unfelt.

He was versed in the knowledge of the world, skilled in the management of its business, abounding in the faculties that made him a mainstay in time of danger. Saturated with self-possession, good temper, meekness, and patience; warm domestic affections, and an expansive, genial heart, that looked much to the welfare of others, and was ever ready, for their sakes, to sacrifice his own.

He was orderly, prompt and exact in all his dealings. Friendships, sincere, and warm, conversations always pure, agreeable, interesting and profitable. It was appropriately said: "Mark the perfect man and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace."

When he laid down the cares of this life he did so as a manly, upright man, who had used the talents given him to the best of his ability.

His face in death was as placid as a sleeping child's. If we keep the faith we shall see him again for

"There is no death, the stars go down
To shine upon some fairer shore,
And bright in heaven's jeweled crown
They shine for evermore."

If those who have entered the great beyond have knowledge of the deeds done in the body, and the life led here, surely satisfaction must fill his heart, as he in the realms of the departed reviews the useful and stainless life he led in this world.

We may well mourn the death of a young man full of strength, power, promise, and unfulfilled possibilities, mark it was a broken column. But when life has reached its fulness, in the ripeness of age, the battle won, and a great man bows his head beneath the touch of death, no one should weep. Such a death is in keeping with such a life.

For seven years I was the pastor of Bro. Roberts, and had abundant opportunity to study his character, and to observe his relationship to the local church, and pastoral charge; and to witness the helpful influence he exerted therein. Bro. Roberts was a model parishioner. He was intelligent, devout, loyal and earnest.

His home was a place of welcome and rest to the pastor.

He was always in his place at church, unless providentially prevented. His public prayers were most reverent, sincere and inspiring.

As class leader, he held class meetings, and one of the most spiritual services I ever attended was a class meeting conducted by him. He was superintendent of the Sunday-school continuously, until a few years before his death, when he asked to be relieved on account of his age and increasing feebleness. When requested to continue, he said, "No, I can see now that a younger and more active man is needed, and I really wish you to elect some one else—but if I should hold on longer, the time might come when you could see this, and I might not, and so feel hurt, at the selection of another."

He contributed to the support of the pastor, and to the general interests of the church, with perfect regularity, and with unusual cheerfulness. A few years ago he told me, that but one year since he had been a member of the church had he failed to contribute to the pastor's support, and that was during the Civil War, and for some cause the pastor left for Conference before he had paid, and never returned, but left the State soon afterwards. And Bro. Roberts added, "If he is yet living and I could get his address, I should be glad to pay him, even at this late day."

His sympathy with his pastor was perfect. He listened to the Word preached with close attention and evident relish, and he did not hesitate to express his appreciation, and in such an evidently sincere way, that the pastor could find no ground for suspecting flattery. He would advise the pastor, when his advice

was sought, not otherwise, and then he would express hesitation in doing so. Yet no one was more capable of doing so—and his advice was often sought. I used sometimes to speak of him as "the bishop of Kernersville," because he was universally loved and trusted in his home town.

I could write of him for hours, but this must suffice. He was my friend, and a "father in Israel." I loved him and to me his memory was very precious. We should thank God that he was given to the Methodist Protestant church, and rejoice in the assurance that he has gone to a glorious reward.

If there was any virtue that stood out more prominent in Bro. Roberts' life than any other it was his benevolence and disposition to do good. He often lost sight of his own interest and pleasure in his earnest endeavor to help others, and he never seemed happier than when trying to make others happy and useful. He was not satisfied with passive goodness, just merely being good, but his goodness was of that kind that forced others to do good. The roughest men with whom he came in contact were obliged to be kind and respectful in his presence.

He was benevolent then, first, by his influence. No one, perhaps, has ever lived in his community who exerted a more wholesome influence than he. In his presence, we were made to feel that we were breathing a spiritual atmosphere rich, pure, invigorating, like mountain air. While his body will molder into dust, he carried in his bosom a power for good that will live on and make rich the lives of men through endless eternity.

Second, he was benevolent in his example. No person's example in his community counted for more real good than his. He was that sort of man that others wanted to be like him. It was impossible of come in touch with him and go away without feeling that you had been in the presence of a man whose life had been touched and tempered and vitalized by the power of God.

Third, he was benevolent by his precept. He was considered authority on all moral questions, for he was always found on the right side. He never entered into anything without carefully weighing all sides, and after his judgment was fully mature he was true to his convictions. Every one considered him a safe man to follow, hence he was a power in his community as a preceptor.

Fourth, he was benevolent with his means. No man, perhaps, gave more thoughtfully, more cautiously, more cheerfully than he. He turned no charitable and worthy enterprise aside without due reflection and consideration. He always helped where help was needed most. He was not stingy but careful how he used what

God had given him. Some might say that he stinted himself, denied himself of some of the comforts of life that he ought to have had, but he only did it that he might be a greater blessing to others. He was indeed benevolent.

RULES OF ORDER.

For the Government of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

- 2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.

- 18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.

- 19. All amen J ments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on the main question.
- 20. All questions of order arising after the previous question has been called for shall be decided without debate.
- 21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and mays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.

- 23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

The Committee on Credentials reported recommending that W. T. Rich be seated as delegate from St. Paul's, W. T. Watson from Anderson Circuit, C. H. Surratt from Denton Circuit, and E. H. Pascal from Vance Circuit. Motion to adopt passed.

Motion to hold a memorial service on Sunday at 2 o'clock carried. Rev. C. A. Cecil was elected a member of the Boundary Committee to take the place of Rev. H. L. Powell, who was kept from the Conference on account of illness of his son.

The order of the day having arrived, Rev. D. S. Stephens addressed the Conference in the interest of Kansas City University, also in the interest of his new book, "Biology and Eternal Life."

After the address of Dr. Stephens the Conference went again into business session.

Motion prevailed to defer the order of the day for ten minutes. The following resolution was offered and adopted:

Whereas this Conference has grown to such extent in the number of fields of labor that it seems to require all the time and energy and physical strength of the president to visit every pastoral charge and fill appointments thereon as has been the custom, and whereas the influence and prestige of our church has extended into unoccupied territory in the district to the point of creating a demand for the personal attention and efforts of the executive officer of the Conference in order to husband resources and membership that otherwise may be lost to us and whereas such needed attention and work on the part of the president cannot be given under existing conditions and the system which requires the president to visit and preach on every charge during the conference year,

Therefore, be it resolved, that the president be not required to so travel the district, but instead be required to devote his time and talents to looking after Church Extension Work, Mission Fields, and general executive business of the Conference throughout the district, and such other duties as this Conference may impose. That the salary of the President be referred to the Ways and Means Committee for such recommendations as this Conference may deem proper, and that the Conference take such action in regard thereto as it may deem necessary.

It being the order of the day, the Conference proceeded to elect officers. Rev. W. E. Swain, D. D., was elected president and S. W. Taylor secretary.

At 10:55 the Conference took a recess for 15 minutes.

It being the order of the day, Rev. F. C. Klein addressed the Conference on the subject of Foreign Missions.

On motion the order of the day was extended ten minutes.

Letter from Rev. J. L. Giles received and referred to the Stationing Committee.

Letter from Rev. C. E. Forlines, D. D., was read before the Conference, also letter from W. F. McDowell, and referred to Stationing Committee.

Greetings from S. Simpson, Westminster, Md., were borne to

the Conference by Rev. H. L. Elderdice, D. D.

Motion that the report of the Stationing Committee be deferred till all other business of the Conference was transacted.

Report of the Committee to publish Journal of 1909 read and adopted, provided that the balance of \$1.15 be turned over to the Committee to publish the Journal of 1910.

MONDAY-Afternoon Session.

The Conference was called to order at 1:30 o'clock by Rev. A. G. Dixon. The Committee on Literature made its report, which was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Unfinished Business was read and received.

Motion that the Subdistrict Conferences be discontinued passed. The Conference adjourned for the meeting of the Conference

Brotherhood. Upon the adjournment of this meeting the Conference was again called to order by Rev. A. G. Dixon.

Rev. Mr. West, pastor of the Kernersville Baptist Church, was introduced to the Conference.

It being the order of the day, Rev. George R. Brown, D. D., was introduced to the Conference and made an address on Ministerial Education.

Rev. H. L. Elderdice, D. D., president of the Westminster Theological Seminary, was introduced and made a detailed report of pledges and collections for the "North Carolina Cottage" to be built in Westminster.

The following resolution regarding the Asheville work was read and adopted: Whereas our prosperous, promising Asheville work is in great need of a meeting place of its own that the work may grow and be made permanent, and whereas our lot there has been cleared in preparation for the erection of a church building, therefore be it resolved.—That this Conference authorize the pastor of the Asheville work under the direction of the Board of Church Extension to solicit in the district funds for the erection of a church building.

The report of the Committee on Colleges was read and adopted. See Reports.

Mr. S. R. Harris, Mr. O. R. Cox, and Mr. J. M. Millikan were elected trustees to act with the ladies in the management of the Orphans' Home.

The report of the Committee on Fraternal Relations was read and adopted.

Rev. T. M. Johnson and Mr. L. L. Wrenn were re-elected Conference Trustees.

Rv. R. M. Andrews was elected Publishing Committee.

Motion carried, requiring Publishing Committee to make the contract for printing Journals of 1911 before the meeting of the next Conference.

The report of the Examining Board was read and adopted. See Reports.

Motion passed that D. M. Loy, H. C. Lanier, J. B. Bivens, and W. R. Blackwelder be granted license to administer the ordinances if the president finds it necessary for them to have such license; provided they have passed successful examinations in studies not yet passed on, such examinations to be given during the interim of the Conference if the candidate desires them.

Motion that the Committee appointed to revise some of the Conference blanks be authorized to revise all of them where it is needed, carried.

Motion that Dr. Travis Surratt and Walter Bunch Surratt be

recommended to the Board of Ministerial Education, carried.

Motion that license to administer the ordinances be granted to Rev. C. W. Bates, carried.

Rev. G. W. Holmes was excused from attendance upon further sessions of the Conference.

The Committee on Sunday-school Banner reported that the banner had been won by Pinnacle Sunday-school. The banner was presented by Mrs. A. G. Dixon and received by Rev. A. L. Hunter.

The banner given by the Ladies' Aid of Asheboro Methodist Protestant Church to the church paying all the Conference claims earliest in the year was won by Thomasville. The banner was presented by Rev. N. G. Bethea and received on behalf of the church by the pastor, Rev. E. Suits.

The report of the Board of Church Extension was read and

adopted. See Reports.

The report of the Superannuate Fund Society was read and adopted. See Reports.

The report of the Committee on Missions was read and adopted. See Reports.

The Conference adjourned.

MONDAY-Evening Session.

The Conference was called to order by Rev. A. G. Dixon.

The Committee on Ways and Means read its report which was adopted.

The following resolution of thanks was read and adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved that our heartiest thanks are due the citizens of Kernersville and the surrounding community for their hospitality so generously extended to the members and visitors of this Conference, and we would now sincerely express and record our gratitude for the kindness we have so much enjoyed during our pleas-

ant sojourn in their happy homes.

We also would thank the authorities of the Graded School for their kind proffer of the use of this handsome chapel for the larger meetings of the Conference. We also highly appreciate the excellent reports to different state papers sent out by the Conference reporter, Miss Dore Kerner. We would further request the publishers of the Forsythe News to publish this resolution, thanking them in advance for this kindness. We also wish to express our hearty appreciation of the untiring work and kind efforts of the pastor of the church, Rev. W. R. Lowdermilk.

Motion that the Conference Sermon be preached at the opening

of Conference instead of on Sunday passed.

Motion that the Conference Sermon of 1910 be published in the Methodist Protestant Herald passed.

Motion that the law regulating the election of delegates to the Annual Conference be published in the Conference Journal, passed.

An offering amounting to seventy-five dollars was taken to augment the salaries of Rev. D. R. Williams and Rev. J. W. Self.

Motion passed authorizing the Board of Church Extension to select from its own number an investigating committee the business of which shall be to visit points where churches are to be built by aid of the Church Extension Fund.

The Stationing Committee made its report. The report was

adopted. See Reports.

The committee to nominate the members of the Board of Church Extension reported as follows: That T. A. Hunter, R. H. Brooks, J. Norman Wills, W. E. Swain, T. J. Ogburn, A. G. Dixon, be elected to compose this Board. The report was adopted.

Motion that T. A. Hunter be asked to act as chairman of the

Board of College Trustees, passed.

Motion to rescind the action selecting Wednesday before the third Sunday in November as the time for holding the next Conference, passed. Motion passed selecting Wednesday before the fourth Sunday in November as the time for holding the next Anual Conference.

The Conference adjourned to meet in Henderson, N. C., on Wednesday, November 22, 1911.



PART II. REPORTS.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the Eighty-fifth Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, Kernersville, N. C., Nov. 17. 1910.

Dear Brethren of the Conference: We have once more assembled in annual session to report what we have done during the past year and plan for future operations. During the year our ranks have been unbroken by death, for which we are truly thankful to the Great Head of the Church. But while the ranks of the regular itinerants have remained unbroken by death during the year, early in April sister Lindley, wife of brother O. A. Lindley, was called home, leaving an infant and her husband in the shadowy vale of time. About the middle of October sister Powell, wife of brother Henry A. Powell, passed out into the vast beyond, leaving a family of bright children and her devoted husband to test the power and purpose of our Heavenly Father to keep those who are bereaved Doubtless the prayers of all the pastors have gone up for these two faithful men of God in their sore bereavement. Those who have been fortunate enough to be in the homes of those good women, now gone, can, in some measure, testify to their merit. May God continue to bless and sustain by His grace the dear ones left be-

Released, Appointed etc. The pastor assigned to Mocksville circuit declined to go and brother D. A. Highfill was induced to take the work and began the first of March. He has been faithful to all his pastoral duties and the people speak in very high terms of the man and his work.

Early in June Bro. H. W. Braswell asked to be released from St. Pauls. After thoroughly investigating the situation his request was granted, June 10th. For some time the church was without a pastor, Bro. C. H. Whitaker and others preaching there occasionally, 'till Aug. 13th, when Bro. E. A. Plyler kindly consented to take charge of the church, since which time he has given his best service to the work. I would recommend that at least fifty of the one hundred and seventy-five dollars appropriated to St. Pauls by the Board of Church extension be paid to Brother Plyler.

The pastor assigned to Rocky Mount station by last conference could not go and after much correspondence the people there decided to decline pastoral care for the whole year and pay what they might be able to raise on the parsonage debt. Therefore the church has been without a pastor the entire year. Conference blanks were forwarded to parties there which may be reported to this body.

The board of church extension made no appropriation for Anderson Circuit nor East Winston, Rocky Mount nor Denton. On three of these the pastors have done faithful work. Bro. L. W. Gerringer on Anderson, Bro. D. R. Williams on East Winston and Bro. W. A. Ledford at Denton. If it is possible to do so I would suggest that these brethren be paid something by the Board of Church Extension. The title to Glen Raven Church having been found to be secure I suppose the twenty-five dollars appropriated by the conference of 1908 has been paid.

Fairfield. It seems very difficult to make any satisfactory arrangement for this place. As it now stands your executive sees no hopeful future for it. There are some loyal good people here, but the one church is so far removed from others of our own, and as the church there is not able to support a pastor, it seems there is but one solution—that is, attach it to the Gaston charge or detach Bess's Chapel from the Lincoln circuit and make a charge of Fairfield and Bess's Chapel. I leave this to the Boundary Com-

mittee.

Some evidences of Material Improvement. During the year Grace Church, Greensboro, has purchased a splendid parsonage worth four thousand five hundred dollars, a new parsonage has been built at Welch Memorial, High Point, Henderson has secured an elegant home for the pastor, a very convenient up-to-date parsonage has been built in Asheboro, a large roomy parsonage with all modern conveniences has been built in Burlington, a well arranged and substantial parsonage has been built on the Monroe work at Pageland, S. C., quite a number of new churches have been built and old ones re-modeled. Possibly there are other proofs of material development which may have been over-looked. It is thought that more money has been put in the building and remodeling of churches and parsonages this year than during any year in the history of the Conference.

Our Educational Work. Yadkin College Institute is doing good work. The enrollment of students is quite satisfactory and Prof. Totten and his assistants are worthy of all confidence. Denton High School, Prof. Geo. L. Reynolds principal, is doing better work than ever before. It seems that the building must be enlarged or the increase in numbers must stop. The work done here is of the very best, the graduates being admitted to the University without examination. More of our young people are attending the different Colleges than heretofore. This fact alone more fully emphasizes the need of a Methodist Protstant College in North Carolina than

any thing else can.

Revivals. The revival interest in many of the churches has been

very pronounced, and, while there seems not to have been that demonstrative enthusiasm evident at some places in former times, there has evidently been a deep spiritual interest awakened in many of the churches. It is very doubtful whether the term "revival" means the same in every place and at every time. Some regard nothing a revival that is not characterized by much noise and momentary demonstration; others seem to calmly and quietly drink deep from the inexhaustible fountain of salvation and only manifest their renewed strength by a more complete consecration and a more Christ-like charity. "Now, there are diversities of gift, but the same spirit." The calmer, more practical evidence of o revival has been more manifest during the year.

Other Interests. During the year a very valuable lot has been secured in Greensboro on which it is hoped soon to erect a suitable building. To Bro. J. F. McCulloch, perhaps, more than to any other one man, is due the credit for this splendid deal. This lot when improved together with our publishing house will go far toward giving our cause strength and stability in North Carolina. Under the auspices of the North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Board of Home Missions an orphanage has been undertaken at Denton, N. C. A number of children have been gathered there under the supervision of Miss Mabel Williams assisted by Miss Etta Auman. So far as known it is the first of its kind undertaken by the Methodist Protestant Church. It is believed by many that this Conference should give the institution its hearty endorsement.

Our Church Literature. To those who are so much interested in the wider circulation of our church papers it seems strange that all our people do not take and read them. Our Church Record, published in Greensboro, is equal to the best and costs about two-thirds as much as some others no larger, and in some respects not so good, and yet the circulation is distressingly small. The Methodist Protestant, published in Baltimore, should be as largely read by our people in North Carolina as if we had no Church Record as our local organ. The two papers both deserve a place in every Methodist Protestant home in the Conference. For, all that we can know of our church, far and near, we must depend largely upon these two papers. Possibly we are falling below the mark in some things because we do not know, and we do not know because we do not read. Some of our young people seem almost embarrassed at times because they estimate the whole church by some small church in the community. In this case wisdom would be a power to disarm such, not only of embarrassment, but fear of failure as well. If one would be strong regarding any given thing or institution, then one must have more than a superficial knowledge regarding the matter.

Pastoral Support. It is a self-evident fact that young men of spirit do not enter the ministry as a money-making business. Sometimes it so happens that those whose wealth increases every year never increase their contribution for the support of the ministry. They must have forgotten their vow at the altar. It might be well for pastors to read the church vow to their congregation at least once a quarter and stop long enough to emphasize and explain what that vow is and means. The average salary paid our pastors is \$459.53. If two or three of our strongest congregations are omitted, the average falls below four hundred and twenty-five dollars When the high cost of living is considered, it is almost a minacle how some of our pastors manage to pay their bills.

There has been some improvement in this matter, but the increase in salary has not kept pace with the increase in cost of living. Some do nobly and their reward is with them. Would that all, laymen and preachers, could break away from the first law of nature which is self-preservation and be more fully under the law of grace which is self-sacrifice. Brethren, these short comings are not brought to your attention to discourage any, but having discovered where we fail, let us try to overcome in the name of "Him

who has called us with an holy calling."

The Outlook. That God has placed the Methodist Protestant Church in a peculiar position is clear to every observing mind. The movement of other religious bodies has made the ground occupied by the Methodist Protestant Church unlike any that has

gone before.

The Methodist Protestant Church to-day is not the battle-ground on which is to be waged a war for supremacy, but a generoushearted broad-minded, far-seeing messenger, bearing the olive branch of peace to those who yet contend with each other when the real cause for conflict has long since been removed. By precept and example we are moving the hearts and heads of others as we have never done before. There are those who naively assert that there is no difference. It is like saying peace, peace, when there is no peace. It is not the intention of any broad-minded man, who has Christ for his example, to throw one straw in the way of a closer fraternal relationship, but be it known that in the concessions made there is no disposition to throw away the best for the thing already conceded to be not quite so good, even by those who have it. Possibly just at this strategical point we should be the more guarded than ever before. If God intends to use the Methodist Protestant Church for some great end to which we have not yet attained, then let us patiently plod on, bide our time, and wait till He shall have accomplished His purpose in us. The best way to help others is to be true to one's self. And now, relying on God for His guidance and with unfeigned gratitude to the ministry and laity throughout the District and praying that the spirit of the Master may characterize the deliberations of this Conference, I am very truly, W. COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

As your Committee on Missions reported a year ago:

"Our Conference as a body and our membership generally believe heartily in Foreign Missions, and by various resolutions and reports of the past we stand clearly committed and fully pledged to this great enterprise of the church. And we rejoice in the gradual increase of our interest in the work as evidenced in our larger contributions year after year. Yet we must admit, with sincere sorrow, that we are not yet measuring up to the demands of the work, the general average of denominational contributions, or our ability to support the cause. We would therefore urge—

- 1. That by every practicable means available, we strive to educate and inspire our people to greater efforts to obey our Lord's last command. Pastors, by faithful preaching on the subject, by recommending and circulating Foreign Missionary literature and by calling attention publicly to the articles appearing on the subject from time to time in our church papers, can greatly further the above proposed end."
- 2. That we accept and apportion to our various charges the sum of \$2,250, assessed upon our Conference by the Board of Foreign Missions and that we try to raise the amount in full exclusive, whenever practicable, of the Children's Day offering which we hope every Sunday-shool will raise. We would recommend also that the Sunday-school collection of Christmas Sunday be sent to the Board of Foreign Missions and that as far as practicable our people celebrate and signalize the Christmas season by helping through the said Board to send the joyful tidings to those who never heard it.

We would note with grateful pleasure the presence and address of Rev. F. C. Klein, the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Foreign Missions, and we wish him success in his faithful efforts.

Through Bro. Klein we obtain the following facts from Japan: Number of ministers and preachers, 30; organized churches 15; societies on probation 5; preaching places, 45; Sunday-schools, 39; with 106 officers and teachers and 2689 scholars. We own in Japan 6 lots, 10 church buildings, 2 missionary home lots—total value, \$40.169. The night school lot and college grounds are worth \$13.400, and the two night school buildings and the six college buildings are worth \$22,375—total value of school property \$35.

785. In the night school are 200 students, and 304 in Nagoya College, 27 of whom will graduate next commencement. A new church has been started in Tokyo and a new one organized in Nagoya. The present urgent needs of the work are: More land for college and science hall; two church buildings; one new missionary home; one new missionary to go over and one to be returned home. The work there has from the first far exceeded in its extent and needs the support we have given it at home, and it mightily behooves us to bestir ourselves to meet the demands God's blessing on our growing work in Japan has created.

Owing to the recent resignation of the former, Secretary-treas, of the Board of Home Missions and the absence of the new secretary elect, Rev. J. W. Beck, and of available literature on the subject, your committee can only commend this great interest to the active sympathy and support of our people, hoping that Bro. Beck can soon supply the church with facts necessary to its proper co-

operation.

Your committee also regrets that since its appointment it has been unable to obtain from the W. F. M. Society the facts necessary to make this report as full and commendatory as we desire but we recommend that our pastors and people use all reasonable and practicable endeavor to encourage and aid the workers in this society in their good work. These remarks and recommendations also must apply to the Woman's Home Missionary Society, whose good work also merits and demands our cordial sympathy and support.

Your committee beg permission to insert here in these minutes such statistics and historic items as may be presented or obtained

before the publication of the minutes.

We recommend the adoption of the duplex envelope system in order that all our people may have a convenient plan for weekly offerings to missions.

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

- 1. During the year the President brought to our attention the conditions at Gastonia, brought about by the depression in the Cotton Mill industry. We recommend an appropriation of \$100.00 for last year, under the same conditions as the appropriations made at the last Conference.
 - 2. At the last Conference, among other points East Winston

Mission was left for future consideration of this Board. The Board was not furnished with the necessary facts to enable it to take any action, but is now informed that the Pastor appointed to this mission was paid \$145.00 by the churches, and that his expenses exceeded this sum \$353.00. The Board would not have felt that it should have made an appropriation equal to this amount to this work, and does not wish to establish the precedent of paying back claims, but would recommend, under the circumstances, that \$100.00 be appropriated to this work for the past year.

The Board calls attention to blanks for monthly reports, and recommends that all pastors serving charges receiving aid, be required to forward these to the treasurer monthly, and in event of failure to do so, or to show faithful service, the Board be authorized to suspend payments on the appropriation to such field.

4. The Board recommends the following appropriations for the

ensuing year, subject to amount which may be collected.

Asheville (for rent of hall), \$157.50.

Chatham (for pastor's salary), \$100.00.—or \$25.00 additional or as much of it as may be necessary to bring pastor's (Bowman's) support up to \$475.00.

Graham (for pastor's salary), \$325.00.

Rockingham (for pastor's salary), \$150.00.

Welch Memorial (for pastor's salary), \$250.00.

Thomasville (on debt church), \$100.00.

Denton (on pastor's salary provided lot is secured and erection of church begun), \$200.00.

Caroleen (last year), \$50.00.

5. The Board has not yet all the necessary facts in the following cases, and recommends that action in regard to these points be deferred to a future meeting.

Rockingham—St. Johns—debt.

Albemarle.

Anderson.

East Winston.

La Grange.

Reidsville.

6. The Board believes it important that a part of the income be saved each year, until a fund shall be accumulated, sufficient to meet the appropriations of the ensuing year, thus enabling the Treasurer to make prompt remittances during the year.

Hence we took the liberty to solicit a statement from them as to whether they would transfer their school, property and good-will to our church and upon what terms they would do so. We were gratified to learn that they stood ready to do this, and have placed in the hands of your committee a full statement of price, terms and conditions upon which such a

transfer would be made with the understanding that same may be submitted to this Conference if it should be first agreed by the Conference to accept this location and property provided the price, terms and conditions of sale and transfer are satisfactory and within the reach of church. Upon such favorable action your committee will immediately submit to this Conference the proposition received from these brethren, the Profs. Holt.

COMMITTEE ON COLLEGES.

Your Committee on Colleges would report:

1. Chancellor D. S. Stephens of the Kansas City University presented to your Committee this communication and request:

To the Committee on Colleges, N. C. Conference, Dear Brethren:

If you can recommend to the Conference that an annual collec-

tion be raised for the benefit of the Kansas City University, as you now do for the Westminster Theological Seminary, I shall be glad to have you do so. In case such a collection should be made, the University will return the amount thus contributed in the form of tuition and expenses to any young man or woman attending this institution that the Conference may designate.

The reasons for this request are that the University is essentially a church extension enterprise in which the whole denomination is interested. Secondly, That the income of the institution is insufficient to meet current expenses, until the time comes that its valuable property can be converted into productive funds. Thirdly, That our Conferences in the North and West are making annual contributions to the Westminster Theological Seminary, and therefore a reciprocal interest in this great denominational enterprise in the West would not be inappropriate.

We regret to have to recommend non-concurrence.

2. We commend Western Maryland College to the patronage of all our people as having no superior in equipment and management and climate. Its president, Dr. T. H. Lewis, is also president of our General Conference and has the confidence and love of all Methodism. Western Maryland is a family school, in that it educates both young men and young women. Yet the two departments are as separate as if they were two distinct institutions.

We report that the Westminster Theological Seminary has passed through its most successful-year, enrolling 40 students from a dozen Conferences. Four students are registered from the N. C. Conference, one of whom will graduate next May—R. S. Troxler.

The president of the Seminary and Dr. C. E. Forlines spent part of the summer vacation soliciting funds for the N. C. Cottage to be built upon the campus and our people responded most liberally, nearly \$2,500 of the proposed \$3,000 having been pledged.

We recommend that our pastors preach on the call to the ministry, and urge our young candidates to take both the college and the seminary courses and that the usual assessment be laid for the Westminster Theological Seminary.

- 4. We pray our Father's blessing upon Adrian College and upon all other colleges and high schools fostered by our denomination.
- 5. We commend to the support of our people Yadkin College Institute and Denton High School as per paragraph seven in President's report.

We recommend that the Board of Trustees of Denton High School be authorized to solicit funds and appropriate same for the enlarging the building and make any other improvements they may deem wise.

6. We note with profound gratitude the generous offer made to

this Conference by Profs. J. A. and M. H. Holt, principals of Oak Ridge Institute, to the effect that our young men preparing for the ministry and the sons of our ministers will henceforth be given free tuition.

7. We recommend that the following Board of Trustees be appointed by this Annual Conference composed of five ministers and ten representative business men; viz., T. J. Ogburn, T. M. Johnson, R. M. Andrews, A. G. Dixon, S. W. Taylor, T. A. Hunter, R. H. Brooks, F. R. Harris, H. T. Powell, O. R. Cox, J. J. Welch, A. M. Rankin, J. R. Cummings, and W. S. Linville;

That this Board be given full power to act on all points pertaining to the establishment and maintenance of a Methodist Protestant school of high grade in North Carolina. To incorporate themselves according to the laws of North Carolina. To select and purchase site appropriating whatever funds may now be in possession of the Conference, to solicit funds and arrange terms of payment. To adopt name and curriculum. To elect faculty. To be self-perpetuating and to enlarge at what time and in whatever manner they may so elect.

RULES OF ORDER.

For the Government of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

- 1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's Annual Report.
- 2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.
- 3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.
- 4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of the Scripture and prayer, under direction of the President.
- 5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.
- It shall be the duty of the Chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflections or irrelevant debate.
- 7. The Chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.
- 8. All the committees shall be appointed by the Chair, unless otherwise ordered by the Conference.
- 9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
 - 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.
- 11. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the Chair.
- 12. No member shall be allowed to speak more than once on any question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.
- 13. No person shall pass between the Chair and a member speaking, nor interrupt the speaker, except by permission to explain.
- 14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud to disturb the Conference.
- 15. Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.
- 16. Members are requested to vote in all cases, except excused therefrom by the Conference.
- 17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.
- 18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.
- 19. All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on the main question.

- 20. All questions of order arising after the previous question has been called for shall be decided without debate.
- 21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.
 - 22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.
- 23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or succeeding day except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- 24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be called up again during the session.
- 25. No person shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.
 - 26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.
 - 27. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.

PROCEEDINGS.

Henderson, N. C., Nov. 22, 1911

The eighty-sixth session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, was called to order by the President, Rev. W. E. Swain, D. D., Wednesday morning at ten o'clock, Nov. 22, 1911. The devotional service was conducted by the President. Hymn 425 was sung, followed by prayer led by Rev. George E. Hunt.

The President read scripture selections from chapters 32 and 40 of the Prophecy of Isaiah and then offered prayer. Hymn 428 was sung and Rev. J. R. Hutton led in prayer. Hymn No. 5 was then sung and the devotional service closed.

Immediately after the devotional service the conference went into business session. The first order of business was the roll call. The following were present: Ministers: R. M. Andrews, D. A. The Secretary reported that Graham and Haw River had won the Banner given to the church or churches, collecting earliest in the year the conference assessments. The Banner was very beautifu'ly presented by Mrs. W. C. Hammer to Rev. Geo. L. Curry for Graham and Haw River.

The conference adjourned.

MONDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

The conference was called to order at 2:30 with Rev. D. A. Highfill in the chair.

On motion the committee on Financial Statistics was allowed to eliminate column for circuit totals on the financial blanks.

On motion, the names of W. D. Reed and R. C. Stubbins were placed on the conference roll.

The report of the conference Treasurer was read and on motion adopted. (See report No. 19.)

The report of the committee on Boundaries was read and adopted. (See report No. 20.)

The final report of the conference faculty was read and adopted. (See report No. 21)

The committee on Unfinished Business reported that no unfinished business could be found. On motion the report was adopted.

The committee appointed to consider letter from R. T. Pickens and make recommendations to the conference reported as follows: Your committee appointed to consider the foregoing paper, having carefully considered the same beg leave to recommend that this paper be submitted to our representatives to the General conference, leaving them to take such action as they may judge best.

Signed, T. J. Ogburn, W. C. Kennett, G. H. Harris.

On motion, the President was instructed to ascertain from Brother Pickens the amount of his expenses to the Federal Council of Churches and report same to the next annual conference.

The committee on Financial Statistics made its report. On motion the report was adopted.

Motion was adopted, that an expert accountant be secured to revise the

Statistical and Financial reports of the conference before they are published in the minutes.

Motion, That the meeting of the conference Brotherhood be the order of the day at 4 P. M., today, carried.

Motion, That Rev. J. R. Hutton be the Conference Treasurer during the inter of the conference till his successor is elected, carried.

On motion a vote of thanks was extended to Shelby and Rehoboth M. P. Churches for their kind invitations to hold the next annual conference with them.

The committee on Colleges made its report. On motion the report was sent back to the committee with instructions that item seven be stricken from the report.

On motion Rev. T. J. Ogburn and Dr. G. E. Matthews were appointed to draft suitable resolutions thanking the city of Henderson for entertainment and the news papers for publishing the proceedings of the conference.

Motion, That S. M. Needham be licensed to administer the ordinances if he be employed by the conference, carried.

Motion, That the law regulating the election of delegates to the annual conference be published in the minutes, carried.

Motion, That the conference sermon be published in the Methodist Protestant Herald, carried.

The order of the day having arrived the conference adjourned for the meeting of the Conference Brotherhood. Immediately upon the adjournment of the conference Brotherhood the conference was called to order by Rev. D. A. Highfill.

The committee on Colleges reported again with item seven stricken out. On motion the report was adopted. (See report No. 22.)

The committee on Statistics reported and on motion the report was adopted and placed in the hands of the Secretary.

On motion the official character of Rev. Wm. Porter was passed.

The conference adjourned with the benediction by Rev. J. D. Williams.

MONDAY EVENING SESSION.

The conference was called to order at 7:30 with Rev. D. A. Highfill presiding.

The following resolution was offered and adopted:

Whereas, the constitution and discipline require the President to preside at the sessions of the conference, which be cannot do while acting as a member of the Stationing Committee, therefore,

Resolved, that the Stationing Committee be composed of a minister and a layman with authority to confer with the President as its adviser when the conference is not in session.

Motion, That the conference present to Miss Church a purse for Stenographic services, carried.

On motion, an offering was received for Rev. J. W. Self, which amounted to \$46.00.

The Sunday School Banner was presented to Rev. A. G. Dixon for the High Point Sunday School, by Rev. W. F. Kennett.

The President appointed the following committee to nominate the Board of Church Extension. Rev. C. A. Cecil, C. H. Surratt, Rev. J. H. Moton.

The committee on Ways and Means made its final report and on motion the report was adopted as read. (See report No. 23.)

Motion, That the paper prepared by Rev. T. M. Johnson showing the date when the ministers of the N. C. Conference become members and the date of the death of the deceased, be published in the minutes, carried.

On motion the name of J. E. McSwain was ordered stricken from the roll. The following resolution was read and adopted by standing vote.

RESOLUTIONS OF THANKS.

Resolved, That our heartiest thanks are due the citizens of Henderson for their unbounded hospitality to the members and visitors of this conference, and we hereby express our gratitude for the many courtesies extended us during our pleasant stay in their homes. We also thank the Henderson Gold Leaf, News and Observer and Greensboro Daily News for the splendid reports of our sessions.

To the pastor of the church, Rev. R. M. Andrews, for his untiring work and efforts, we also desire to express our appreciation.

The following letter, addressed to Rev. W. R. Lowdermilk was read before the conference:

Please say to the conference for me, that Oak Ridge Institute will give free tuition, and aid in other ways to any young man who wishes to prepare himself for the ministry, provided he is recommended by his quarterly conference. And to the sons of all ministers of the Methodist Protestant Church.

On motion the conference adjourned to meet in Burlington, Thursday, November 21, 1912 at ten o'clock.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To The North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, Henderson, N. C.

DEAR BRETHREN:- In the providence of God we are permitted once more to meet to transact the business of the church and rreport what we have done during the Conference year now closed.

During the year two of our number have been called to their reward. Early in the year Bro. W. L. Harris, whose genial spirit had made glad so many lives went to the center of Joy. Later Bro. J. H. Turner, at a ripe old age, answered the roll call in heaven. Committees to write obituaries have been appointed and will report at the proper time.

RELEASES AND APPOINTED.

Immediately after the last session of Conference Bro. W. P. Martin was released from Caldwell and at the request of some of the brethren of Monroe was assigned to Monroe, where, so far as I know, he has been faithful to his trust. Bro. J. B. Bivins was released from Mecklenburg and assigned to Caldwell. Mecklenburg then being without a pastor, Bro. J. W. Self was assigned there and has done a good work. East Winston being unsupplied at last Conference Bro. Mansfield Owen of Yadkin College was asked to give work what time at his disposal Being in school he gave the work Saturdays and Sundays till vacation during which time he devoted all his time to the charge till leaving for school at the opening of the fall term. Rev. HomerCasto asked to be released from his charge during the summer months which request was granted.

The pastors have been faithful in the discharge of their duties and

where prayer and perseverance has been at least some satisfactory degree of success has been enjoyed.

Not all the charges in the district have been visited. The new plan of work for the executive has not been all new nor has it all been old. It has been found difficult in some sections to make the new plan work. So many seem to think what they contribute to the president is for the sermon he preaches at church to which they happen to belong, and claim to be under no obligations to the president unless he visits and preaches at their church. It is believed by many that the executive can do more good to have the general oversight of the whole district than to spend so much time on the road. Doubtless the plan inaugurated at last Conference is a good one, but it will take more than one year to make it workable everywhere.

TWO SPECIAL NEEDS.

Again it becomes necessary to emphasize the great need of more money and men. The great coffers of the country are full. The volume of money in circulation seems to increase as commercial demands require. The people verbally assent that the claims of God upon what we have and are must be the first consideration and all secular interest secondary, and yet the church so often lags for want of the best that professing christian men and women might give and be. No worthy minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ expects to lay up much for a rainy day. Often when worn and weary with the weight of long years of arduous toil, living or trying to live, on a salary so alarmingly small that the faithful pastor in old age faces a condition so appalling that young men of ambition and spirit are deterred from the Ministry even when they feel called to that work. Some may say if he be called to the ministry he can not afford to ignore the call and if he does it is at his peril. Granted, but what of those whose stinginess and conceit in some measure at least thwarts the purpose of God, deflects a promising life and at the same time greatly imperils the salvation of all whom this deflected life might have helped? But money aside from men counts for but little. The knowledge of men regarding matter is going forward at a prodicious rate and unless the church can draw into its service at least some of the trained minds of the day it will not be long till we shall be a nation of pronounced materialists. To be sure the church has enlisted very many of the Masters, but the per cent of trained men in the church giving their time to the furtherance of the Kingdom is not as large as it should be. I would suggest that all our pastors preach at least one sermon at each church served not only on the call to the Ministry, but especially on the call to prepare for the Ministry. It seems that the great need of the church today is more men and better prepared men.

SOME HOPEFUL SIGNS.

That benevolence is on the increase is evident from the fact that there

are more eleemosynary institutions in our country per capita than ever before, and much of the energy that once went to noise alone is now being turned into practical channels of real helpfulness. In our own Conference there has been some advanced steps taken this year. High Point has paid off the debt on the church amounting to nearly One Thousand dollars. Chapel Hill on the Davidson work, has been painted at a cost of Fifty dollars and new organ for Elbaville Seventy-Five dollars—A Twelve Hundred dollar home has been bought in Mocksville for the pastor. On the Caroleen work two churches have been built, one in Shelby and one in Lincolnton, the two costing Two Thousand—Four Hundred and Ton dollars on the Denton charge the following: Land for Orphanage \$2200.03. Church \$2303.00. School building improvements \$450.00. Lot and material at Southmont, \$300.00. Other improvements not reported.

ROCKY MOUNT.

It seems that no satisfactory arrangement can be made for this place. It has been the desire of your executive to find a supply for this charge, and the situation there has for two years been of deep concern. During the year just past both the church and parsonage have been rented, approximating Twenty-Five dollars a month. Whether any of this rum has been paid on the parsonage debit or not I do not know. Possibly there will be some report from this place made to this Conference which will enable the Conference to see what is best to be done under the circumstances. There are some good loyal Methodist Protestants there and the problem demands the prayerful consideration of this body.

THE ORPHANAGE.

This institution though young has appealed to our people and some of them have come up strong in its support. During the past year the people of Denton have purchased additional land costing Two Thousand dollars. The number of children cared for at this institution has steadily increased and many applicants have been denied a place there for want of room. It is the first, and so far as known, the only orphanage we have undertaken. For these reasons it should be regarded as belonging to the whole church and should be fostered and supported by the whole church. The orphanage is in many respects on stronger ground than ever be ore and the work it has already done should appeal to the entire denomination.

OUR LITERATURE.

That we have as good as the best no one will deny. That the cost of blank paper has increased is evident. That the cost of labor and material has increased is true. And yet we are offering the best at a price lower than that charged for similar productions. It might be well for pastors to bring the matter of our literature continually before the people in some public way and then date its merits along the highway and by the fire-side. It is feared by some that we are so very modest that we fail to let the world know who and what we are. Because of the peculiar postition we occupy in the great celesiastical historic movement of today our convictions, our attitude and our pourposes should be more clearly understood by all both of our own church and others. There is no open channel so well suited to this as our own church literature. The Methodist Protestant Herald, published in Greensboro, N. C. at One dollar a year is the equal of similar publications at One dollar and fifty cents. It is clear in tone and clean in matter and strong in expression. It should go to every Methodist Protestant home in the N. C. Conference and many outside. Protestant, published in Baltimore, Md., is admittedly one of the strongest religious journals to be found. This much is admitted by many not of our communion who are in a postition to know. This able periodical is cheap at Two dollars a year and may be had for the sum of One dollar and fifty cents. Why all our people do not take them both some cannot understand.

The Vance County Methodist Protestant, edited by three of our Ministers and devoted especially to the interest of our church in the neighborhood of Henderson, N. C., deserves more than passing notice. It is

worthy of a stronger support than it has yet enjoyed.

The Methodist Recorder, published in Pittsburg, Pa., is a stronger paper and while circulating largely in the North and West ought to be read more by our people in the South and East. It is painful some times to find Cooks Sunday School literature in what claims to be a Methodist Protestant Sunday School. It may be that in some cases this is the best that can be done, but if possible Methodist Protestant Sunday school literature should always be used in Methodist Protestant Sunday schools.

EDUCATIONAL WORK.

Yadkin College Institute continues to do splendid work. Prof. Totten and his assistants are faithful and those who complete the course there stand well in whatever college they enter. Denton High School has really been over crowded and yet the work done has been of the best. Prof. Reynolds and his assistants deserve the hearty co-operation of the whole church. In consideration of what Oak Ridge has done for the church at large and for many of the members of this Conference in particular the thanks of the whole church should be tendered and the path to its doors be made as smooth and straight as possible for every young man who can be induced to go there. As a matter of fact, West Maryland College stands in the front rank of Southern educational institutions. As a result of its intrinsic worth it has steadily grown. We should have double the number of students there that we have. This institution with the Theological Seminary is doing a great work for our church and deserves our hearty sup-

port. Rev. T. H. Lewis, D. D., L. L. D., president of Western Maryland College and Rev. H. L. Elderdice; D. D., president of Westminster Theological Seminary deserve the fullest endorsement of this Conference.

PASTORAL SUPPORT.

To be sure we are improving in a sense, that is more is paid the average pastor than formerly, but when the actual cost of living is considered it is doubtful whether the average pastor receives more than he did twenty-five years ago. It is believed by many that he really does not receive as much. Possibly there is not a charge in this Conference that is not able to pay every claim. To pay all claims would naturally generate more self respect and greatly help in the onward march of the kingdom. Some do nobly and justly merit the highest esteem of their fellows. Let us all learn to emulate the example of those whom we praise.

THE OUTLOOK.

We are facing the future. What that future for the Methodist Protestant Church in North Carolina means is for us to detrermine. Questions of larger volume are daily coming before us. Christian Endeavor, Epworth Leagues, Baptists Young People's Societies and similar organizations are being multiplied and the scope of their operation enlarged, yet no one of these nor all of them seems to be done. There seems to exist deep in the restless realm of soul a hungering for more than these have brought. Some times the soft refrain of a song has strangely stirred this speechless impulse. Our machinery is all that human learning and inventiveness can make it yet the stifled cry of the soul finds no verbal expression. What lack we yet? May it not be that in the mad rush of the strenuous age, when the demands are for specializing, we are allowing the altar fires to burn low. Indeed it might be well to ponder. A small engine well charged with steam is much stronger than a large one cold.

It is more clearly evident now that human ability alone cannot do the work than ever before. The task before us transcends all human power. It might be well during this session of Conference to take time to look within. There is no time lost in earnest prayer.

And now, with a prayer to Almighty God for the guidance of the Holy Spirit during this session of Conference and with profound gratitude to the ministers and laity of the district for their uniform kindness, I am,

The books of the treasurer have been audited by an expert public accountant. He reports them correctly kept and in good shape. As you are doubtless aware, a movement was set on foot by the editor of the Methodist Protestant Herald to secure money to purchase a lot and to erect a building, the income to be used for the benefit of a proposed college, the conditions being that if said college should not be built by 1920, the surviving contributors should then determine what other interests of the church should receive the benefit of it. The lot in question was purchased and held by individual trustees. It was later agreed between these trustees and the trustees of the Publishing House that the property should be deeded to the Methodist Protestant Publishing House, who would assume the obligations of the trustees to the contributors to carry out the conditions under which the contributions were made, and should further assume the unpaid balance on the lot. There has been paid upon this lot by the contributors \$1772.75, which is held as a trust fund. In the event

of the erection of a building, should a sufficient amount, to pay for same complete, not be contributed, it to be understood—that that interest of the church, which is to receive the benefit of this fund, would be a share holder in the lot and building to the extent of the amount contributed, and should receive its due proportion of the income. There is an unpaid balance on the lot of \$6,000,000, the original cost of which was \$7,500.00. The Publishing House has no other indebtedness.

Since our previous report to your body, we have sustained the loss of our president, Brother O. R. Cox, of Asheboro. Brother Cox was one of the most liberal contributors to the Fublishing House, a member of the Building Committee, and has been president from the date of its organization. Suitable resolutions will be prepared, and will be spread upon the minutes of the Publishing House. F. R. Harris has been elected president to succeed him, and the vacancy in the Board of Trustees, caused by his death, has been filled, subject to your approval, by the election of Geo. B. Harris of Henderson, N. C.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We realize the fact that the legalized liquor traffic still exists to destroy human lives and human souls. It is a constant manace to the peace and happiness of the people.

But we also recognize with profound gratitude to Almighty God that much has been done in recent years to abolish this nefarious traffic in many parts of the world; and especially do we rejoice on account of the progress made in prohibition in our own State; but we greatly regret that prevailing conditions are such that we are not able to make our prohibition laws entirely effective.

We deplore the fact that many of the secular papers advertise alcoholic liquors, and would suggest to our people that it is unwise and dangerous to lend aid to such publications by giving them our patronage, or by admitting them into our homes.

We regret that in a great measure our State prohibitory laws are nullified by the National Government permitting shipment of liquor into prohibition territory.

We recommend that this Conference appoint a delegation consisting of one ministerial and two lay delegates, to-wit: Rev. T. M. Johnston and Bros. T. T. Hicks and A. J. Harris, to represent the Methodist Protestant Church of the North Carolina District in this Convention.

We further recommend that this Conference devise a plan by which to secure funds to defray the expenses of this delegation.

There is no better definition of Sunday Schools than the Church at work. Where there is a live Sunday School there is a live Church. About 90 per cent of the accessions to the Church come from the Sunday Schools. With these facts before us it is our indispensable duty to pay more strict attention to this branch of Church work especially in rural districts. It is a well known fact that every body's business soon becomes nobody's business. This being true we advise for the best interest of the School that the Supt. or School appoint or elect at least two or three of their number to select new scholars. Pastors we believe can encourage the faithful workers by frequently calling attention to the good done by their patient efforts. Parents should be urged both from the pulpit and in the home to attend the Sunday School with their children. We also insist on prompt-

ness on the part of Superintendent and teachers. Have an hour appointed to begin school and begin at that time. The Board of Young People's Work, which was organized especially to help our Sunday Schools, reports the last year, the best yet. We recommend the organization of teacher training classes wherever possible and that the classes enroll with the Board. As the Board has no assessment we recommend each school make an offering for the support of the Board. We call attention to the fact that the Board will gladly send free literature to all Sunday School workers.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The missionary movement was inaugurated by Jesus Christ, our Savior. He expects it to go on till it has reached and impressed all men. It is through His disciples that He would win other disciples, and He directed His followers to make disciples of all nations.

The Methodist Protestant Church is honored with a part in the great and glorious work of world-evangelization, and is now operating in Japan and China. Reports from our missionaries there show that our opportunity is greater than we have as yet made provision to mect. Men and women that we might induce to become Christians are living and dying in the hopeless wretchedness of heathenism. Children that we might instruct in the knowledge and service of Christ are growing up under the baneful influences of superstition and idolatry.

Love to Christ and love to men alike call us to greater carnestness and more liberal effort.

We are glad because of the success already achieved and of the devotion to the cause now manifest.

We have in charge of our foreign missionary work the Board of Foreign Missions, elected by our General Conference, and the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, a voluntary association of Christian women of our Church. Money given to either of these will we believe be honestly and economically expended in furtherance of missionary work.

Our Church is fortunate in having for its missionary secretary Rev. F. C. Klein one who by personal experience as a missionary to Japan, knows the condition and needs of our mission field in that country. We advise that our people read Secretary Klein's reports and give earnest heed to his appeals.

The women of our Woman's Fereign Missionary Society far excel the average of our membership in intelligent interest in missionary work. They meet regularly to study missions, they plan and work to earn money for missions, they subscribe for and read a missionary journal. We believe their efforts worthy not only of recognition, but of high commendation. We believe their executive board and our Board of Foreign Missions should each be glad of the other's existence, and that the two boards should counsel together and by supplementing each other's work achieve most for the present and conserve most for the future.

We are pleased that the field agent of the W. F. M. S., Miss Anna L. Forrest is to visit our district in the interest of their work. We bespeak for her everywhere sympathy and helpful consideration and open pulpits in her effort to enlist more of our women in missionary work.

We have the following as the latest statistics of our work in Japan:

OUR WORK.

Our Mission Conference is composed of three Missionaries, thirteen Japanese ministers, ten preachers, and one employed minister and seven evangelists, a total working force of thirty-four.

There are three organized churches in each of the three cities of Tokyo, Yokohama and Nagoya, and one each in Shizuoka, Iwabuchi, Oyama, Ejiri, Takaoka, Hammamatsu, Yokkaichi, and Handa, total seventeen, besides three missions nearly ready for organization, and twenty-six other appointments, a total of forty-six.

The reports ending Sept. 30th, 1911, show that there were 1148 full members, 234 probationers, 418 absent members, enquirers enrolled 309, total 2109.

There were ten church buildings, another in course of erection, six parsonages, and a number of houses rented for chapels and parsonages.

There were forty-five Sunday schools with 2713 scholars and 119 teachers, making a total of 2832, and there were five C. E. Societies.

The School of English (Night School) had seven teachers and an enrollment of 204 young men, besides a Girl's afternoon department with 35 enrolled, which department the W. F. M. S. is expected to conduct.

The College at Nagoya, the fourth city of the Empire, population 400,-000, had nineteen teachers and 320 young men enrolled.

There are church lots, school and college grounds and two Missionary Home lots which are valued at \$40,000.

In addition there are two Missionary Homes, twos chool buildings at Yokohama, and six at Nagoya, together with churches and parsonages, most of them built in semi-foreign style, which are valued at \$36,000, a total of \$76,000, upon which there is no debt.

We recommend that where it is practicable pastors organize and aid in conducting mission study classes.

What we have accomplished is gratifying, but we should not be satisfied with our own action until we are conscious that we are doing our full duty. Our ability we believe is greater than our interest. Let us think more, read more, talk more of mission work. From the pulpit and through the press information should be imparted that will awaken interest and a desire to help. Out of the darkness come cries of want and distress, From our Master comes the command of love: "Go ye into all the world." May our Church become as an angel of Heaven in obedience and loving ministry. Signed,

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COLLEGES.

Your Committee on Colleges would reports as follows:

- 1. With profound gratitude we acknowledge the good work Western Maryland College has done for the people within the borders of the North Carolina Conference. Its work is second to none and few colleges if any, with its advantages offer so moderate rates. We recommend it to the patronage of our people as having no superior in equipment, management and climate. Western Maryland is a co-educational institution, yet the two departments are separate and distinct, doing its own work and each being given attention according to its respective needs.
- 2. We do not forget that Adrian College and Kansas City University are offering most excellent advantages and that our people at different times have shared these advantages. We can heartily commend these splendid institutions to the patronage of our people.
- 3. We pray our Father's blessings upon Wesminster College of Texas and all other colleges and schools of our denomination.
- 4. We would note that Yadkin Collegiate Institute and Denton High School, the institutions of our own conference, are doing good work. We desire to express our appreciation for the services of the men who are conducting these schools and urge that our people support them.
- 5. Oak Ridge Institute has at various times favored us by giving free tuition to children of ministers and to ministerial students. This offer is still extended to us. For this attitude toward our people we are profoundly grateful to the principals of this school.
- 6. We report that the Westminster Theological Seminary has passed through a most successful year, graduating last Commencement 15, men. The Adrian Theological Seminary which was started two years ago was

discontinued last June and Ex-President, Dr. H. L. Feeman accepted a chair in the Westminster Theological Seminary. Dr. C. E. Forlines has recovered from a long and serious illness and is now filling his place in the faculty. The N. C. Cottage has been built and is now occupied by Dr. Forlines. The Building Committee borrowed \$1500 to complete the Cottage which has cost \$3,000. Six N. C. students are now in the Seminary, two of whom, C. W. Bates and J. E. Pritchard, will graduate next May and report for work in our District.

We recommend the same assessment as last year and that we try to pay it in full.

We also recommend that the unpaid pledges to the N. C. Cottage be redeemed as soon as possible and that those who have not contributed give something to this new monument to N. C. loyalty and liberality.

7. We recommend that the committee appoint at a previous conference to act on all points pertaining to the establishment and maintenance of a Methodist Protestant College in North Carolina, be discontinued with powers as previously given.

MINUTES OF THE ELECTORAL COLLEGE.

The Electoral College was formed Friday afternoon, Nov. 24, at 3 o'clock. Rev. W. F. Kennett was elected president and S. W. Taylor secretary.

On motion it was agreed that on the third ballot ministers only be voted for. The third ballot was then taken, resulting in the election of Rev. N. G. Bethea, Rev. G. W. Holmes and Rev. J. F. McCulloch.

The fourth ballot was taken Monday morning for ministers only. The Judges reported no election.

On motion the fifth ballot was taken for two ministers and seven laymen. The following were elected: Ministers, Rev. G. F. Milloway; Laymen, R. T. Pickens, J. Norman Wills, Prof. W. H. Holt, Dr. W. R. Goley, J. D. Ross.

The sixth ballot was taken immediately and resulted in the election of two laymen, A. J. Harris and J. H. Harrison.

The seventh ballot was cast and Rev. W. F. Kennett was declared elected. This ballot completed the election of delegates.

On motion, it was ordered that the four ministers and the four laymen receiving the highest number of votes on the first ballot be declared elected as alternates, the order being according to the vote received.

MEMORIAL OF REV. JOHN H. TURNER.

The following is account of his death as given by the News & Scout, his home paper.

Rev. John H. Turner died at his home here yesterday afternoon about four o'clock after a lingering illness of several months. Mr. Turner was probably the oldest citizen of this community. He was born July 16th 1838 and was therefore 73 years one month and five days old. He married Miss Mary Shaw, in 1857 and she died Oct. 31, 1874. To this uhnion eight children were born, Belle, Annie, Lillie, Margarete, G. N., Rodman, E. B. and J. A. The second time Mr. Turner married Miss Jane Mangum, daughter of the late William Mangum, and to this union twelve children were born. Rose, Ellen, Henrietta, Blanch, Prudence, Fodie, T. W., Robert, Sam, Geo., Max and Jefferson.

Mr. Turner was a gallant soldier in the civil war. He has been preaching ever since the close of the war. And has been master of the Masonic Lodge nearly forty years. He had many political offices, having been Coutty commissioner and represented this county in both houses of the legislature. Mr. Turner was probably the best known man in the county, having lived here his entire life. He is survived by his wife and eight sons and five daughters.

Rev. John H. Turner was born July 16th, 1838 and died Monday, August 21st, 1911. He was converted in the year of 1858 being 20 years old at this time. He joined the M. E. Church and was licensed to preach and preached in that church until the General Conference passed that strenuous law requiring local preachers to have permission to preach in the M. E. Churches. He was so moved as that he left that church and joined the M. P. Conference, South Carolina in the year 1897. We have

not the information at hand to know how many charges he served in said conference but know he served said conference as President for two years.

He joined the M. P. Conference of North Carolina, in the year 1901. He traveled the Chesterfield circuit as pastor quite a number of years and was a faithful pastor and a man of a strong determination. We regard him as a man of fine intellect and was well informed. He was most able in prayer and had fine preaching ability. He is the father of Rose Hill Church which is one among our best churches and we consider him as one of the great reformers in this community.

Bro. Turner said during his illness he was fully prepared to die. He had many friends. He rests in the beautiful little cemetery near the church which was always so near his heart. A beautiful monument placed at the head of his grave by kind loving ones marks his last resting place until his and our descending Lord shall come. May we all so live as to share with Bro. Turner in that last and greatest redemptive work the blessed ressurrection, and together may we share the glory that shall follow.

Well may we say:

"Servant of God, well done,
Thy glorious warfare past
The battle fought, the victory won,
And thou art crowned at last."

MEMORIAL OF REV. WILLIAM LATIMUS HARRIS.

When I first knew "Lat" Harris, as he was familiarly called, he was going in the wrong direction. That course he pursued for some distance. Then he saw "the error of his way;" and he had the power of will to change it. For thirty-five years of his life he journeyed toward the "Celestial City;" and during all those years he persuaded and constrained others to go with him. His efforts were attended with success. After he attained to man's estate "he saw in the way a light from heaven." Feeling the need of education he attended college thereafter, for five years, during all which time he applied himself diligently to study and meditation. In the year 1883 he joined the N. C. Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, and for twenty-seven years he did what he could to serve it and to draw men and women into the kingdom.

For ten of those years he served charges in different sections of the conference and state. The other seventeen years he dwelt among his own people ministering to the churches and people of our denomination in his native county of Granville and Vance, formed from Granville and Halifax.

In the year 1910 he was smitten by the "great white plague," and after lingering a few months departed this life Dec. 22, 1910 at his home in Henderson, in the 56th year of his life.

Bro Harris was twice married, both wives being daughters of our highly

esteemed brother Ferdinand H. Whitaker of Halifax county. Sarah survives him and also Edith, the only surviving child of Lelia who died in the vear 1897.

Though he dwelt among and served his native people, he was not without honor among them; this is attested by his long pastorate in Halifax. He was not an explorer in creeds or doctrines. (His thoughts and discourses were not as original or novel as those of some others.) He believed and preached and lived the old fashioned religion in the old fashioned way. It was good enough for him and for a great majority of those who came within the sphere of his influence.

As the result of his ministrations, a great number of people found better ways of living; became servants of God and supporters of his cause.

It occurred unto him as unto many others; "his life contains no material for eminent distinction, or great fame, or perhaps for long remembrance; but it does contain the material and present the scene for a normal human development kindly led by the divine spirit through mingled joy and sorrow, labor and rest, adversity and success, through the tender loves of childhood and mature years. And in the day of his strength while life was yet full of its legitimate interests and satisfactions, and he was yet "alluring to brighter worlds and leading the way," he passed into the voiceless mystery of death. We cannot but believe that it is for countless quiet. simple lives like his that God made and upholds this earth. Viewing his career at its close, we label it in cleric phrase: "Servant of God well done."

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

RULES OF ORDER.

For the Government of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's Annual Report.

2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers

of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.

3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.

4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion

of the Scripture and prayer, under direction of the President.

5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.

6. It shall be the duty of the Chair, or the privilege of a member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflec-

tions or irrevelent debate.

7. The Chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.

8. All the committees shall be appointed by the Chair, unless

otherwise ordered by the Conference.

- 9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
- 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of a tie.
- , 11. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the Chair.

12. No member shall be allowed to speak more than once on any

question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.

13. No person shall pass between the chair and a member speaking, nor interrupt the speaker, except by permission to explain.

14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently

loud to disturb the Conference.

- 15. Members shall retain their seats, unless to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.
- 16. Members are required to vote in all cases, except excused therefrom by the Conference.
- 17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.
- 18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.

19. All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken

on the main question.

20. All questions of order arising after the previous question has

been called for shall be decided without debate.

21. The division of all questions by yea or no. The yeas and nays shall be record on the jorunal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.

22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.

23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority on the same or succeeding day, except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed, shall be

called again during the session.

25. No person shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.

26. No committee shall meet during the sesion of Conference

unless excused by the Conference.

ELECTION LAW OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE.

The Second Quarterly Conference of each charge, pastor's charge shall nomnate double the number of laymen to which the field of labor may be entitled, as delegates to the Annual Conference. The pastors shall announce from each pulpit the names of the nominese, and appoint a day which shall be that on which his appointment shall fall at each church, if practicable, for taking the vote by ballot, for the number to which the charge may be entitled; the ballots cast by members over twenty one years of age, to be received by stewards and class leaders under the supervision of the pastor, and by them to be counted, and the count to be forwarded to the Third Quarterly Conference to be compared by that body. The brother or brethren receiving the plurality of votes shall be declared duly elected, and a certificate shall be given accordingly; and the pastor immediately after the Third Quarterly Conference, shall certify to the Secretary of the Annual Conference representative elected

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

To the Eighty-Seventh Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, Burlington, N. C.

November, 21, 1919.

DEAR BRETHREN:-

By the grace of God we are permitted to meet again in annual session. Since we last met three of our number have been called, and are gone from among men. On Februatry 24th, 1912, the spirit of brother E. A. Plyler took its flight. In the army of God, fighting for the right, he proved himself as fearless and valiant as when he faced the enemy on the tented field.

On May 24th at 5:00 a.m., brother S. Simpson answered the summons. His had ben a busy life and if all whom he helped and inspired had each dropped one small blossom in the grave there had been no need of earth for he would have rested beneath a wilderness

of powers.

Later Brother John N. Garrett left his earthly home and the shadows that hung over his natural vision to be in the blessed light of a sunless day. Many are they who attribute their conversion to his earnest appeals and presistent efforts.

Committees on obituaries have been appointed and at the proper

time will report.

In April, at the earnest solicitation of the Board of Home Missions, Brother Fogleman resigned from Buncombe circuit that he might give his whole time to Asheville. An effort was made to supply Buncombe for the remainder of the year, but all efforts to do so failed and the circuit has been without a pastor since except such service as Brother Fogleman could render in connection with Asheville.

On account of failing health, on August 24th, Brother Homer Casto asked to be relased from Efland station, which request was granted. Brother R. C. Stubbins has very acceptably served the charge since,

In August Brother Albert H. Bryans asked to be released from Albemarle and while your executive was not perfectly satisfied as

to the wisdom of such a step his request was granted.

Since the resignation of Brother Bryans Brother J. H. Abernathy has held some very good revivals on the charge and the work seems in fairly good condition.

PASTORAL WORK.

During the Conference Year the pastors have been faithful and some have done unusually good work. Some of the fields have been too large and under present circumstances can never hope to develop. If men can be had to take charge of the increased number of charges it is believed that Cleveland, Lincoln, Forsyth, Guilford and possibly others should be divided or the boundaries so changed that the number of appointments would be materially reduced.

Pensacola should be made a station and Greenville and Spring

Church should each have a pastor's whole time.

These, together with some other points should engage the serious attention of the Committee on Boundaries.

PASTORAL SUPPORT.

To be sure our pastors seem to be receiving far more per annum than in past years. But even this is only seeming. The real purchasing power of a dollar goes far toward determining how much money a man has or receives.

Again, do pastors receive the sympathetic and moral support of the church that it is reasonable to expect? The helpful influence a pastor has in the homes of his parishioners among the young people and children depends in a large measure upon the attitude of parents toward their own pastor as well as all ministers in general. Parents who speak slightingly of their own pastor or ministers of the gospel in general should not be surprised later to find their children disrespectful, irreverant and Godless.

OUR PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

The M. P. Herald is not receiving the support it should. To increase the circulation would be to leave more of the rents for other things. In some localities the people decline to subscribe for the paper because it does not reach them till after the Sunday following its issue. It is believed by many pastors who have tried to secure subscriptions that the circulation might be largely increased if it were issued early enough in the week for the paper to reach the extreme limit of the Conference by Saturday. It might be well for this Conference to express itself regarding this matter. It is believed the editor would appreciate an expression of this kind. The paper is good when it arrives, but sometimes "good" is an enemy to the

best. If possible there should be some arrangement made by which the editor could give more time to the editorial work of the paper.

At the last session of the General Conference steps were taken looking toward combining the Methodist Proitestant and The Methodist Recorder, making one large general organ of the two. Were this accomplished and a slight reduction made in the price when the local church organ and the general church organ were both subscribed for at the same time it is thought that the circulation would so largely increase that it would be a paying venture. All the papers mentioned are good, but we should be satisfied with nothing short of the very best.

Our Sunday School literature is of the very best and no publication of Cook's should be found in a regular Methodist Protestant Sunday School. The seeming difference in price does not compensate for the actual loss sustained. The very fact that some fail to realize the loss is but a stronger proof that the use of alien literature is unsafe.

THE ORPHANAGE.

This instituion has so far attracted the attention of all our people that it is now an established fact. The vigorous campaign for funds with which to build, the liberal response, the business tact and push of some of our best business men, the unfailing faith of many of our noble women and the hearty endorsement of the enterprise by the whole church through the General Conference are not only pleasing but are causing many to thank God and take courage. The splendid building is now well on the way and the undertaking merits the unstinted support of all our people.

I here leave for others a fuller statement of the present condition of the Orphanage as well as the possibilities of the future.

UNION.

At the last session of our General Conference the question or organic union with the United Brethren in Christ was fairly submitted to us. In order to make a call for an extra session of the General Conference possible, that this matter might be more fully considered, it will be necessary for two thirds of the Annual Conferences to vote concurrently for the call. It is in order for this Conference to take action in the matter.

ROCKY MOUNT.

On March 4th, your executive in company with Brother C. L. Whitaker visited Rocky Mount to ascertain more fully the condition of affairs at that place. We found that the parsonage had been sold and the proceeds invested in real estate, etc. The people there expressed a desire that they appoint three commissionrs to hold the funds in trust and use the proceeds of the fund to educate young men for Methodist Protestant ministry in North Carolina. As the church

was regarded as extinct, (see discipline 1908, page 127, paragraph 6.) it was suggested that a commission be appointed to take over the property of the church building and make such disposition of it as would best serve the interests of the Methodist Protestant Church. This was objected to and a wish expressed that the members be called together and a vote be taken as though the church were not extinct. This finally agreed to with the understanding that the Board of Church Extension be consulted and concur in the action. Later a meeting of the Board of Church was called and the whole matter gone over. It was the opinion of the Board that the people at Rocky Mount should name the three Trustees as desired, and that when a vacancy occurred by death, or otherwise, the remaining two should name a successor, subject to the approval of the ensuing Annual Conference, and that he proceeds of church sale be turned over to the Board of Church Extension. The decision of the Board was submitted to the people of Rocky Mount and a copy retained by the Secretary of the Board. If any action has been taken by any one, other than that stated above, it has not come to my knowledge. I would suggest that this Conference appoint a commissioner with full power to act and that this matter be settled at the earliest possible day.

ASHEVILLE.

On September 1st, the out-look there was not very flattering. The reports since received have indicated very little improvement. The report of the pastor who has been serving that charge this year will bring information more fully up-to-date.

GENERAL FINANCE.

Previous to last session of the General Conference each of the General Boards of the church estimated the amounts necessary to meet the needs and apportioned the sum among the Annual Conferences. At the last session of the General Conference an Executive Committee was created to take this work of apportionment in hand. The Executive Committee met in regular session and the following amounts were apportioned to the North Carolina Conference: Foreign Missions \$3,600; Home Missions \$3,600; Colleges \$2,160; Ministerial Education \$960; Seminaries \$840; Young People \$600; General Conference \$120; which is herewith submitted for the consideration of this Conference. As a matter of course this should be referred to the Committee on Ways and Means

QUARTERLY REPORTS

Some of the quarterly reports are so indefinite and vague that it is clear that we should have a uniform blank for such reports. These, when properly filled out would put such information in the hands of the president as would put him in immediate touch with all the churches. If possible, it might be well for this Conference to appoint a committee to draft a blank and submit it to this body.

THE OUT-LOOK.

With each succeeding year the scope of vision and the work of this Conference becomes more pronounced. The problems increase in number and also become more difficult. To meet these, realize the magnitude of the work and solve the problems at hand, is the task before us. We can not afford to do less, our very life as a denomination depends on our doing more. It will require the very best executive ability, the hearty co-operation of the ministry and laity, coupled with the sustaining grace of God and the leading of the Holy Spirit, for us to measure up to the tremendous responsibility. And now, with feelings strangely mixed, with a greater love for all the brethren of the Conference than ever before, thanking both the ministry and laity for the genuine kindness shown through all these years, with a fervent prayer to God that His divine blessings may rest upon us, and that the Holy Spirit may have right of way in all the deliberations of this Conference, this report is respectfully submitted.

Hard as the thoughts of people center around and upon certain religious and ecclesiastical doctrines, dogmas and ceremonies we get a religious or denominational literature. Our Church has produced and is producing a Methodist Protestant literature. We are sending out from Pittsburg and Baltimore, leaflets, quarterly periodicals, papers and books, the garned wisdom of our own best thinkers. And our literature is best for our own people for many reasons, not of the least of which is, it gives our-view-point of the problems of our Church in all her problems from the mission church to the college. We therefore commend our Sunday School literature and would insist upon it being used in all of our Sunday Schools We know our Church papers are the best papers for our people, and would ask for a hearty support of these papers. Our two general Church papers should be taken at least one of them, in every Methodist Protestant home. We believe the movement inaugurated at the last session of our General Conference to unite the Recorder and the Methodist Protestant should and will be consumated, but we urge our people to patronize them now and think that all should at least take the Methodist Protestant.

The Methodist Protestant Herald published in Greensboro, has not yet received the support it deserves. We should not be satisfied with less than three thousand subscribers to it, and we urge our pastors to ake an earnest, faithful effort to increase the subscription list to this nuber

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COLLEGES.

We, your Committee on Colleges report that we rejoice to learn of the splendid equipment and of the efficient work that is being done by Western Maryland College. We recommend that our young people contemplating attending college be informed of the advantages of said college, and of its nearness, in that only a few hours ride will bring one to it.

Adrian College has done, and is still doing a great work in

training the young people of our church.

Kansas City University is doing her part in this great work, and with the success of this institution rests the future of the M. P. Church in that section.

In regard to the letter from Rev. T. L. Garrison asking for the assessment for colleges, and if agreeable to us, a part of the Seminary assessment, we would recommend that no money raised as assessment for the Seminary be paid to that school—Westminster College, of Texas. But when we shall raise an assessment for Colleges that said College be remembered in the distribution of the money, and we commend it to our people for sympathy and financial support till its struggle for existence has ceased, or until we have a college enterprize within the bounds of our own Conference.

We recommend that a man be sent to Denton to take charge of the Denton High School. We ask for a serious consideration on this subject.

Westminster Theological Seminary is better equipped than ever before, and it is a great factor in building up our church in every Conference. We commend it to our people for all possible aid.

We recommend that an earnest effort be made to collect the remaining pledges to the North Carolina Cottage. Yadkin Collegiate Institute we recommend to our people for support and patronage.

Your attention also, we would call to the kind offer of the principals of Oak Ridge Institute, who offer to train our young men preparing for the ministry, and also the sons of our ministers, without charge for any tuition

Believing, that to a large extent, the destiny of the Methodist Protestant Church in North Carolina lies in the training of our young people, and confident that not only the ministry, but the laity must be trained, and sure that we cannot hope to take the greater number of our young people out of our state to college; therefore, We recommend that every reasonable effort possible be made to establish a college within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference and that the committee apointed by this Conference to investigate the proposition of the representation from Starr, be also authorized to consider any other proposition that may come before them during this Conference year, and report to the Annual Conference.

In harmony with the sugestion of the Executive Committee of the General Conference, that each Annual Conference may choose where its collections for Seminaries shall be sent, we recommend that all money collected for Seminaries in the North Carolina Conference be sent to the Westminster heological Seminary.

We are glad to know that Elon College offers training to young

men preparing for the ministry of our church, and to the sons and daughters of our ministry, without any charge for tuition.

(3). We wish to call attention to the standard of excellence recommended by the Board of Young People's Work consisting of the Cradle Roll, Home Department, Organized Bible Classes, Teacher

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS

We wish to express our appreciations for the most excellent work our Board of Home Missions is doing, and we are especially gratified for the assistance the Board has given in our endeavor to establish our Church in Asheville. The Secretary-Treasurer informs us that the Board has been paying \$400.00 per year and the salary of the pastor at that place and the interest on the debt amounting to \$820.00 in all.

We also note with pleasure that Mr. T. A. Hunter, an honored layman of our Conference, is continued as a member of the Board.

We are pleased to know that the receipts of the Board during the last year were increased more than ten per cent, and that this district contributed its propotion of this increase, yet our contribution of \$1,319.21 for the last fiscal year of the Board is less than 60 per cent. of our assessment and is far too small to meet the great needs of the work. Therefore we recommend

(1). That the assessment as ordered by this Conference be apportioned to the several charges and raised in full during the month

of December.

(2). We recommend that Easter service be held in all our Sunday Schools and an offering taken for the work of the Board.

(3). We recommend that each pastor preach at least one sermon during the year on the needs in the Home land, emphasizing the

fact that less than forty per cent of our people are even nominally Christians and less than twenty-five per cent are nominally connected with Protestant Churches,

"We must save America to help save the world."

We fel that we now through our Board of Foreign Missions are doing a work in the foreign land at which we may well be gratified, but we still fall short of duty, and should never be satisfied while we fail to collect every cent of the assessment laid by this Conference. We shall never measure up to our duty until our people are thoroughly imbued with the great truth that we have no right to live unless we strive to help extend the kingdoms to the utermost parts of the earth.

We would recommend that the assessment as ordered by this Conference be apportioned to the several charges and that a determined effort be made to raise the full assessment.

We further recommend that every Sunday School observe Children's Day and take an offering for the Board, which should be a free will offering over and above the regular assessment

We also recommend that our pastors by special sermon shall teach our people that we must be a missionary church, for if we cease to be such we shall cease to exist.

OBITUARY.

E. A. Plylr was born June 26, 1845, and died February 24, 1912, aged 66 years, 7 months and 28 days. He professed religion in his boyhood days and joined the M. E. Church South. Later in life, finding the principles of Methodist Protestantism more congenial to his nature, he removed to the M. P. Church, of which he remained a loyal and energetic member to the time of his death. He volunteered and served three years in the Civil war. Brother Plyler died at his home in Albemarle. He was taken sick in Grensbore last November while pastor of St. Pauls Church, from which sickness he never fully recovered. Congestion of the brain was the direct cause of his death. He suffered much. For about 24 hours before death came he knew nothing. All that loving friends and physicians could do was promptly done, yet to no good, for it seemd that God spoke—"Well done, thou good and faithful servant, come up higher." (The last conversation.)

In 1866 he was married to Miss Cassander E. Rogers. To this union six children were born and four of them are now living. His wife died in 1878. In the Fall of 1879 he was again married, this time to Miss Kitty B. Moody, to which union two children were born and one of these is now living. In the year 1883 death again came into his home and claimed this wife also. Now left alone with several children, yet he kept his head above the waves and fought manfully onward. In 1888, he was married to Miss Mattie C. Nicholson, who

with her eight living children still survives him.

Brother Plyler joined the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church in 1885, and has served the following charges, viz: Mecklenburg, three years; Buncombe two years; Forsyth one year; Lincolnton four years; Randleman two years; Stanley three years; Davidson one year; Lincoln one year; Mt. Herman two years; Gastonia one year; St. Paul two years.

As a pastor Brother Plyler was energetic and persevering. He attacked sin in all its phases with gloves off. His manner of presenting the truth was convincing and winning. He was no respector of person, but "meted out to all" the unadulterated word of God as he understood it. As a revivalist he displayed unusual energy and was almost always successful. On one occasion, his zeal and enthusiasm beame so great he overcome his physical strength and was taken from the church, many thinking he was dead. However, in ten or

fifteen minutes he revived and in spite of the entreaty of his physician, returned to the church and continued the service with wonderfull results. In the loss of this "Saint of God" this Conference has lost one of her best revivalists. As a husband, Brother Pfyler was kind, as a father, he was loving; as a neighbor he was accommodating.

and had many triends wherever he went.

He was buried in the cemtery in the town of his home. The funeral service was conducted by his pastor, assisted by Revs. Messrs Rogers and Thacker of the M. E. Church. The day of the funeral was rainy and very rough, yet our church in Albemarle was well filled with sorrowing friends and relations. The large crowd that attended the feneral services and that followed through the rain to the cemetery, was proof of the high esteem in which he was held in his home town. We feel that a "strong man in Israel has fallen," as of our best preachers has ben taken from us.

OBITUARY.

In memory of our beloved and esteemed Brother John Newton Garrett, who was born in Alamance County, N. C., May 28, 1848; died at his home Yadkin College, N. C., July 29, 1912. Aged 64

years, two months and one day.

Brother Garrett had been a victim of heart disease for several years, and blind. He was away from home when taken with a general breakdown. He came home to battle with the infirmities of the flesh for some four months. At last God claimed His own, and he was not, for God took him. There were three physicians with him, but there was no human aid that could relieve him. His suffering was intense. He endured with fortitude and courage. Off times singing the old time revival hymns and praising God when so feeble in body that the end seemed near. Brother Garrett's memory was clear, forgetting nothing it seemed, up to the very last. He talked much of the church and brethren. He had a great desire to live, if it could be the Master's will, to meet you all once more in Annual Conference, and to visit all the churches he had served in the past. He felt he had a message for the people he had never had before, as he had been so long in death's door.

He was married some 36 years ago to Miss Mollie Phillips of Yadkin College, N. C. To this union were born six children, three sons and three daughters. The two older sons and daughters are married. Miss Jewel married Mr. Isley and lives in Alamance County near Graham, N. C. Miss Ila married Mr. Holder and lives in Ashboro, N. C. Ruby married and is practicing faw in Oklahoma. Brice married and is living at Yadkin College, N. C. The two younger children, Vance and Veta are with the widowed mother at Yadkin,

North Carolina.

HIS LIFE'S WORK.

His first lesson was taken from farm life. He was studious and applied himself to his books; completed his education at Yadkin College, N. C. For several years he was a teacher. He was first authorized to call sinners to repentance at the Fonrth Quarterly Conference of Alamance County Circuit on November 2, 1872 Rev. J. W. Heath, pastor. He was ordained Elder in the Methodist Protestant Church at the Annual Conference of 1880, Rev. J. R. Ball, President, and Rev. R. H. Wills, Secretary. He entered the itenerant life in 1882. The Annual Conference convened at Shiloh Methodist Protestant Church, Davidson County, N. C. He was in the active iteneracy seventeen years, during which time he served the following fields of labor: Alamance, Forsyth, Mecklenburg, Moxville, Roan Mission, Randolph, Surry, Yadkin, Yadkin College. Brother Garrett told his pastor during his sickness that twelve years of the seventeen he received less than a support; one year receiving only \$113.00. Thus ends a hard and laborous life. We miss him here; he is missed at home in the family circle. His pastor misses him for when we were assigned to the Yadkin College Circuit in 1909 we found him sweet-spirited helpful and true.

Now he is gone, we extend our deepest sympathies and prayer to the sere and bereaved widow and weeping children, and mourn

our loss as a Conference, yet, our loss is his eternal gain.

If he had faults, and he did—let us now cast the mantle of charity and emulate the good.

IN MEMORY OF S. SIMPSON, Ph. D.

On Saturday morning, May 4th, 1912, the friends of Dr. S. Simpson were shocked to learn of his death. For many months he had been in ill health, and it was known that his condition gave little hope of recovery, but it was not thought that the close of his life was so near. Because he had lived in readiness for this hour, the Death Angel did not find him unprepared From his home in Westminster, Maryland, he went percefully to his home in heaven.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist Protestant Church of Westminster, conducted by Rev. D. L. Greenfield, D. D., pastor of the church, assisted by Rev. T. H. Lewis, D. D., President of Western Maryland College, and Rev. H. L. Elderdice, D. D., President of Westminster Theological Seminary. His remains were taken to Henderson, North Carolina, and buried near that place beside those of his first born child, a little girl of three years, who died before

the family went to Westminster.

Dr. Simpson was born in Rockingham County, North Carolina, May 13, 1848, and was married to Ella Eugenia Gooch, of Henderson, North Carolina, May 16, 1876. He is survived by his wife and four children, Aiss I. Jewell 8 mpson, assistant editor of the Democratic Advocate, of Westminster; William Gooch Simpson, clerk in the Westminster Deposit and Trust Company; Ellery DeWitt Simpson, assistant surgeon in the University of Minnesota; and L. Earle Simpson

assistant secretary of the State Board of Education in Maryland.

In 1873, Dr. Simpson was graduated from Trinity College, North Carolina, and such ability and force of character did he display that shortly before his graduation he was elected President of Yadkin College, North Carolina. Though he was ordained in 1879, he never served a pastoral charge. He remained President of Yadkin College until 1883, when he was elected Professor of Natural Science at Western Maryland College, which position he held for seventeen years. Early in his occupancy of this professorship he took a course in Natural Science at Johns Hopkins University and received the degree of Doetor of Philosophy, which degree had been previously conferred upon him by the Lutheran College in North Carolina. In June, 1900, he was elected Superintendent of Public Schools in Carroll County, Maryland. This position he held at the time of his death.

Dr. Simpson was a Christian gentleman. He was modest and anassuming, and had the rare faculty of never-failing courtesy. By the community he was greatly respected and by the church much beloved

A good man has gove, but his work survives. He has erected few material monuments, but he has made impressions which time cannot efface. Whether as president, professor or superintendent, he directed the thought of the young; he was a potent factor in developing their minds and shaping their characters. He accumulated but little of this world's goods, but because he lived the world is better. Though he knew not the joys of the Christian pastor, in the joys of the Christian teacher he was rich. He will be remembered for the good he has done.

(9) That Maple Springs be detached from East Winston and King, Crooked Run and Dalton be detached from Pinnacle and Mt. Zion and that these churches be attached to Forsyth Circuit.

(10) That Harmony Grove, Pleasant Hill, Baltimore, Stony Knoll and Union Hill be detached from Forsyth and that these con-

stitute a charge to be known as Western Forsyth.

(11) That Ore Hill be detached from Buncombe and attached to Asheville.

(12) That Pensacola be detached from IIvey and be known as Pensacola Station, and that he remaining church on Ivey be attached

to Buncombe and that the name Ivey be discontinued.

(13) That Glen Raven be attached to Graham and Haw River. That Carolina be attached to Fairview, and that the name Glen Raven and Carolina be discontinued.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

We, your Committee on Ways and Means, beg to say that we have recommended different plans at different times, and finding that the Brethren have their different plans and times for collections; we therefore recommend the prosecution of such plans on the different fields as are the most effective in teaching the people liberality and also teaching them the importance of supporting the different causes to which we are asked to pay.

After investigating we find that the work being done at the Orphan's Home belongs to the Methodist Protestant denomination,

especially the North Carolina Conference; therefore, be it

Resolved, First, That we recommend that each pastor see to it that an "Orphan Home Day" be observed in each church at which time a program suggested by the Executive Committee of the Woman's Home Mission Society may be used, the claims of the Orphan's Home presented and an offering taken. The time for holding the day being left to the Quarterly Conference.

(2) Believing that it is most important that the children of the church and the Sunday School be interested in the Orphan's Home, we recommend that collection be taken once a month in each

Sunday School for the benefit of the Orphans' Home.

(3) We recommend the organization of Women's Home Missionary Societies, Young People's Societies, Childrens' Mission Band where it is at all possible, and where it is not possible that one to three ladies be appointed by the pastor of each church whose duty it shall be to solicit offerings in cash and supplies, such as clothing, food and such other things as can be profitably used by the Home, the pastor to report the names of said committee as soon as appointed to the person in charge of the Childrens' Home.

(4) Resolved, That each church hold a service in the interest of the Childrens' Home and take a collection on Thanksgiving Day,

or the previous Snday, or as near these dates as possible.

- (5) That this report be published in the Methodist Protestant Herald in the months of May and October, accompanied by one or more articles under the supervision of the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Woman's Home Missionary Society.
- (6) That all money and supplies be sent to Miss Etta Auman, Denton, N. C., until further notice be given.

We do not want to go on record as being rebelious, but in view of the fact that the reports coming up from the pastors of the various charges show a large deficit.

- (2) That a number of our best charges are asking for a reduction in their assessments, claiming that they cannot well pay the present assessment
- (3) Other charges claiming that if a small reduction could be made it would encourage them to try to pay in full.
- (4) Our own Conference needs more Church Extension money than we are now raising and yet we are afraid to increase the assessment for fear it will discourage our peple.
- (5) We believe that any material increase in Conference assessment will decrease rather than increase the collections.
- (6) Inasmuch as the North Carolina Conference is building a Children's Home that will cost them with what outside help they get, \$20,000, and that it will cost from \$3,000 to \$5,000 per year to maintain it, Therfore we recommend the following assessments:

Your Committee is aware of the fact that a number of charges believe that their assessments are too high. This may be so, but let all charges remember that the Conference gives us a certain amount to apportion. This we have done to the very best of our ability and in doing so we have taken into consideration pastor's salary, membership ability to pay, willingness and every thing else that we think should have a hearing, and have carefully and prayerfully consdered the whole and made the assessment, and hope it will meet with the approval of all.



Rules of Order

1. After the opening of Conference, the first business in order shall be the reading of the President's Annual Report.

2. At 3 o'clock p. m., on the first day of the session, the officers

of the Conference shall be elected by ballot.

3. The President shall take the chair at the hour to which the Conference adjourned and call the Conference to order.

4. Each morning session shall be opened by reading a portion of

the Scripture and prayer, under direction of the President.

- 5. At the meeting of each daily session the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding day, and the Conference correct and prepare them for registration.
- 6. It shall be the duty of the Chair, or the privilege of $\mathfrak a$ member, to call any brother to order who may indulge in personal reflections or irrelevant debate.
- 7. The Chair shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Conference, which appeal shall be decided without debate.
- 8. All the committees shall be appointed by the Chair, unless otherwise ordered by the Conference.
- 9. The President may participate in debate by calling a member to the chair.
- 10. The President shall vote on no question, except in case of
- 11. No member shall speak on any question without rising from his seat and respectfully addressing the chair as "Mr. President," and being recognized by the Chair.
- 12. No member shall be allowed to speak more than once on any question, except by unanimous permission of the Conference.
- 13. No person shall pass between the Chair and a member speaking, nor interrupt the speaker, except by permission to explain.
- 14. Members shall not converse together in a tone sufficiently loud to disturb the Conference.
- 15. Members shall retain their seats, unless rising to speak, or for the purpose of retiring.
- 16. Members are requested to vote in all cases, unless excused therefrom by the Conference.
- 17. No motion shall be entertained or debated until the same shall be seconded.
- 18. All motions and resolutions made and seconded shall be open for debate, except the previous question, the motion to adjourn, and to lay on the table, which questions shall be decided without debate.
- 19. All amendments shall be disposed of before the vote is taken on the main question.
- 20. All questions of order arising after the previous question has been called for shall be decided without debate.
- 21. The decision of all questions shall be by Yea or No. The yeas and nays shall be recorded on the journal by the call of one-fifth of the members present.
 - 22. All resolutions or amendments shall be reduced to writing.
- 23. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, except made by a member who voted with the majority, and on the same or suc-

ceeding day except by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

24. No motion or resolution indefinitely postponed shall be caalled up again during the session.

25. No person shall speak more than five minutes without permission of the Conference.

26. No committee shall meet during the session of Conference.

27. All petitions and resolutions shall be referred to proper committee.







Order of the day was then taken up and the consideration of the subject of church union was at that interest that when the hour to hear Dr. Tagg arrived the order of the day was deferred so as to dispose of the Church Union question. Mr. S. R. Harris and Dr. L. E. Davis were heard on the subject.

Rev. R. L. Davis, Supt. of Anti-Saloon League of N. C., was introduced to the Conference.

J. A. Ledbetter was elected Statistical Secretary and R. S. Troxler and W. A. Ledford appointed assistants.

erty was accepted by a rising vote of thanks.

R. L. Huffine, A. B. Kimball and President Cecil were elected a committee to settle up the Rocky Mount property affairs, and turn over the amount collected above necessary expenses to the Board of Church Extension to be used under the direction of Conference.

The following resolution was adopted: (See Resolution No. 2.)

Paper from Oak Ridge Institute read and referred to Committee on Colleges.



Reports.

REPORT NO. 1-PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the North Carolina Annual Conference—Dear Brethren:

Grace be to you and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. After another year's toil we are permitted to meet in the eighty-eighth session of our beloved Conference.

Since we last met three of our brethren have been called from us. Rev. J. E. Hartsell departed this life Dec. 22, 1912. We will not forget this splendid man. Rev. P. D. Moore fell asleep Feb: 16, 1913: Like a shock of corn cometh in his season, so went Bro. Moore to the garner of God. Rev. John W. Heath closed his eyes in death Feb. 25, 1913, and peacefully passed into the life beyond.

These three deaths, my brethren, overshadow us and call to mind that our hearts are beating funeral marches to the grave. Obituary committees were promptly appointed and will report at the proper time to this Conference.

RELEASES.

On Dec. 10, 1912, Rev. T. A. Plyler was released from the pastorate of Fallston Circuit by request. On Jan. 10, 1913, Rev. J. F. Dosier was released from Rockingham Circuit at his own request. On May 28, 1913, Rev. W. D. Fogleman was released from Haw River Circuit on account of failing health. A. H. Bryan's resignation was offered and accepted as far as the executive had authority and it remains for this Conference to act on my decision.

SUPPLIES.

On Jan. 10, 1913, Rev. T. A: Plyler was appointed to Rockingham Circuit. On Jan: 20. 1913, Rev. D. A: Highfill was appointed to Fallston Circuit: On June 13, 1913, Rev. W. F. Ashburn was appointed to Haw River Circuit.

Immediately after the close of Conference I commenced my year's work. December the 8th I began to visit the fields of labor. On the 24th of August I completed my visits on all fields except one, viz., Harmony Church. I have by invitation revisited several fields. I found some charges in very good condition and others not so good; but this condition need not surprise any one, for when we consider the pastor and the people and the general surroundings, one is made to wonder how they succeeded as well as they did. Some of our pastors preach, plan and work hard, and they do well, and the membership they serve usually take hold and help, but, on the other hand, some do not preach very well and do not know how to plan

well and dislike to work, and the people follow after their leader and the desired results are not obtained and the delegate comes to Conference and wants a change of preachers, and the preacher in some instances does not know the reason for such a request. The greatest need I find in the North Carolina Conference is leaders, and one of the duties of a pastor is to lead and thereby make leaders among his members. Many of our members are capable of leading, if they were trained and put at it. To be an efficient pastor is no small thing. To be a leader among the laymen is a matter of no small import. There ought to be more and better pastoral work done throughout our Conference.

Our church papers and periodicals should be put in every home possible. I have faithfully called the attention of our people to this and am looking for increased results. We are expecting to hear the subject discussed by our editors and agents at this session. We hail with joy all of our general agents and will hear them gladly on the interests they represent and will co-operate as far as we can.

We have two schools in our Conference being run by our ministers, and they should receive our attention and patronage as far as is practicable: namely, Yadkin and Denton institutes.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

I believe this to be a very important work in our Conference, so much so that I have created a committee to report to this Conference on the subject. I believe it would be wise to select a man to be keep our Church Extension Agent, whose business it would be to raise extension money and establish churches at proper places.

'there are several places within the territory touched by our Conference which offer opportunities to our Church. Our pastors cannot leave their charges to avail of these openings. We need more tall money to accomplish the work that needs to be done.

OUR CHILDREN'S HOME.

This Home is not officially known by this Conference, as it is now situated and governed. I presume it will be so before this annual session closes. This is a great institution and I commend it to all and I trust its management will be such as will enlist the sympathy asd help of all. I believe all public appeals for help should come under the signature of the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee.,

SUMMER CONFERENCE.

I desire to express my appreciation of the ideals and aims of those who are in the management of this new and I trust permanent in-

stitution of our Conference. I advise our brethren to avail themselves of the opportunity and to plan to participate in its benefits.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Churches and parsonages have been improved throughout the District and some new ones built. I am not prepared to give the improvements in full, so I prefer to let pastors report to a committee and let it be published in the Minutes. The spiritual state and condition of the Church seems to be fair, judging from reports. Many good revivals have been held and I trust we will have an increase of membership.

PASTORAL SUPPORT.

During the year I have endeavored to emphasize the importance of adequate salaries for our pastors and the payment of the general interest assessments in full, and I believe with faithful, kind and business-like appeals from pastors and President the response will be more general. Several charges have increased the salary for the incoming year. Let the good work go on.

BOUNDARIES.

Some changes need to be made and as I have advised the pastors and members to agree and report to the Committee on Boundaries I will make no recommendations.

CHURCH UNION.

We are called upon to consider resolutions sent down by the commission of the General Conference, to be read at the proper time. discussed and acted upon.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

After careful and due consideraation, I make the following recommendations:

- (1) That the President shall not be eligible for more than three years in succession.
- (2) That the Conference at this session take some steps toward a District Parsonage.
- (3) That we have a uniform plan by which we raise pastor's salary and general interests and that the plan be as definite as possible.
 - (4) That the pastorate be not more than four years.
- (5) That all committees through their Secretary report to this Conference.
- (6) That those who are entitled to administer the ordinances be recommended by the Secretary of the Faculty.

In concluding this report I desire to express my sincere thanks to all who have received me graciously and cared for me tenderly. I

am debtor to you, my brethren, and to Almighty God who has protected my life and preserved my health so I have been able to cover the long distances and to perform the duties of this office.

Praying that the guidance of His Spirit, the bestowment of His wisdom and the blessings of His peace may be upon us as we deliberate upon the questions which will come before us, I am yours in the work.

REPORT NO. 2-LITERATURE.

Perhaps few if any other forces have so much to do with the developing of a people as the literature they make and read. That our Methodist Protestant periodicals and Sunday-school supplies are as good as the best and for us the best of all is true without doubt. We do not suffer because of any lack of worth or merit in our literature, but we do suffer and our development is retarded by the fact that our periodicals enter too few of our homes and hence are read by too few of our people.

We therefore recommend that a vigorous campaign on each field be made during February or as soon thereafter as practical in an effort to place the *Methodist Protestant Herald* and the *Methodist Pro*testant in every home of our people.

In order that this effort may be more effective we recommend that pastors appoint at each church canvassers to assist in procuring subscriptions to these papers.

We recommend that in the adoption of this paper the Conference respectfully request that the editors or publishers of these papers cooperate by supplying sample copies of their respective papers to such pastors as indicate their willingness to engage in the proposed canvass.

Our people should use our own Sunday-school supplies including the New Guide. We do commend most heartily to our people the Woman's Missionary Record and The Methodist Recorder.

REPORT NO. 3-ORDINANCES.

Our pastors should administer the Lord's Supper as the Discipline requires, if possible, and they should be careful to impress upon the people its importance, its nature and design; and they should further impress upon them the fact that if they fail to observe it is to disobey our Lord's command and bring condemnation on themselves in thus refusing to show forth their Lord's death until He come again. Too many people look upon the Lord's Supper as unnecessary. Our Lord never gave an unnecessary command. It is a means of grace to every devout soul.

Our pastors should never receive an unbaptized person into full membership in our church. Infant baptism should be urged upon the parents of the church and its importance impressed upon their minds. The church is getting too negligent on this point. If infant baptism is right and proper we cannot be too careful in practicing it. And if parents would strictly perform their vows taken when their children are baptized, there would not be so many ungodly young people breaking their parents' hearts and disgracing society by their immoral lives. Parenthood is a solemn responsibility, but it is assuming a more solemn responsibility to vow before God and man to train our children in the way they should go, and for the service of God and the church. Parents should be made to fully understand these things, and that they should not neglect their duty toward their children. Respectfully submitted.

As a result of our deliberations after a conference with the chairman of the Commission on Church Union elected by our General Conference, Rev. Lyman E. Davis, D. D., we offer the following resolutions for your consideration:

Resolved—1 That we declare ourselves in favor of union with the Church of the United Brethren in Christ under the conditions stated in the resolutions following:

- 2. That we join in the call for a special session of our General Conference to which the Basis of Union shall be referred.
- 3. That we instruct our delegates to favor any basis of union that does not require the surrender of anything vital in doctrine or polity on the part of either church and that will secure unanimity of action on the part of both churches.
- 4. That the basis of union agreed upon by the General Conferences of the two churches be handed down by our General Conference to the Annual Conferences of our church for ratification.

REPORT NO. 7—ASHEBORO STREET PROPERTY.

I herewith submit a report concerning the property in Greensboro which was purchased as a college site, and which is held under your direction by R. M. Andrews, R. H. Brooks and J. Norman Wills, Trustees.

The property consists of about 14 acres of land, on which are three dwellings which have been rented for \$10 a month each. One of the dwellings has been rented for \$12.50 for the coming year. Two of the dwellings are old and occasional repairs have been necessary. There is due on the property \$4,900. The income from rentals has been sufficient to pay the Interest. Insurance and Repairs. In addition to the income from rents, we received as net proceeds in a law-suit against the Southern Railway Company, which was compromised, \$69.03. Interest on \$4,500 is paid to December 29th. Interest on \$400 is paid to August 1st. Balance on hand is \$86.89. It will benecessary to put a new roof on one of the dwellings.

I would be glad if you would appoint an Auditing Committee to examine the books in detail. In future, it is my intention to make an annual report.

We find that the will of the late J. C. Roberts directs that during the delay in building a college, the interest on his bequest shall be applied according to the best judgment of the trustees to the education of poor young men for the ministry.

We would therefore recommend that the Annual Conference request all pastors to seek out young men of promise for the ministry but without means to attend school, confer with them and study them, and if they show a disposition to make an earnest effort to prepare themselves for the ministry of our church, to send their names and all pertinent information about them, together with the names of three reliable men of their respective communities, to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, J. REPORT NO. 10-MISSIONS.

The Committee on Missions would report as follows:

The church gave to the board of foreign missions last near nearly \$24,000, and in the past five years it has given over \$117,000. These funds support three missionaries and their families and thirty native preachers and evangelists who besides their Sunday preaching at fifty-two appointments deliver 2,458 sermons and lectures a year, and run twenty-three prayer meetings, serving fifteen regular churches, and 14 chapel organizations, with nearly 1,500 members, and 53 Sunday schools, with 2,970 scholars.

These funds have also together with those of preceding years built up and maintained properties in Japan, valued at nearly \$80,000, including college and school properties worth over \$30,000, where over 600 students are enrolled. We regret to learn that the board lacked the money necessary to meet the increasing needs of our growing foreign missionary work: especially that it is unable to return to the foreign field at the earnest call of the foreign mission conference the tried and true missionary now at home, the Rev. F. A. Perry. We commend the earnest and faithful services of our worthy Secretary-Treasurer, of the foreign mission board, and highly appreciate his visits to our Conference.

The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society raised last year \$20,000 and in the past five years have raised \$92,000 for its work. For thirty-five years they have labored in Yokohama, Japan, which has been the center of their various educational and evangelistic enterprises. They have properties in Yokohama, Nagoya, and Hamamatsu, valued at \$50,000, all reported in good condition, and out of debt. They employ in Japan six missionaries and 28 helpers. At Yokohama they have 250 students in their various day schools, and their nine Sunday schools, in which they labor to come in touch every Sunday with 500 or 600 children. In an area covering 200 miles around Yokohama they visit 150 families every month. This society has opened up an interesting work in Kalgan, in North China, where they have two schools and an under-dispensary, and 250 native

Christians. They publish at Greensboro the *Missionary Record* also, the only periodical devoted to missions in our church. We would commend their work to our people, hoping their efforts may never antagonize but always help the other departments of our missionary work.

The Woman's Board of Home Missions deserves the hearty endorsement, sympathy and support of the entire denomination in its excellent work in the mission school of Pine Ridge, Kentucky, and its maintenance of the Children's Home of High Point, N. C., the only orphanage belonging to the Methodist Protestant Church and the most beautiful and appealing benevolence dependent on the gifts of our people. We cheerfully commend the management of both these institutions as worthy of all confidence. The \$25,000 Children's Home property is a concrete and beautiful expression of the generous and noble response of North Carolina Methodist Protestants and their friends to the earnest and business-like solicitations for a worthy cause. And those who have contributed so liberally to the establishment of this home will now give cheerfully for its continued support. We your committee would express our gratification at the parental care exercised over the church's children by Mr. and Mrs. Garrett, who have, at the loss of their private home life and of some earthly gain, undertaken to make of the orphans' house a children's home. In this institution, the youngest child of our church, our church is calling little children unto Jesus, and we may feel assured God's blessings will rest upon all who contribute to such a glorious work.

REPORT NO. 12-COLLEGES.

"The church that does not educate must die." This remark was made by an intelligent and influential man in the church of which he is a member. Is it true? It is a fact that the churches that are the most hopeful and he most progressive are the churches that do Our own dennomination has, from its very beginning, recognized the need of the denominational school, and has always tried to establish educational institutions along with the other enterprises of the church. Western Maryland College and Adrian College are proofs of this statement. Each of these splendid schools had its beginning in the earlier years of the church. We rejoice greatly in their growth and usefulness and share this same gladness in the prosperity of our younger denominational schools. Tehuacana College, Texas, is doing splendid work for the Sonthwest. Kansas City University is destined to become a mighty educational factor in the Central West. West Lafayette College is doing splendid work for the church in Ohio. All of these schools have come up through great difficulties and have added all the more glory to their achievements because of the difficulties through which they have come. If they had given up because of discouragements they would have ended in failure long ago.

In our own Conference we have Denton High School and Yadkin Collegiate Institute, both of which are doing good work for our people and for the communities in which they are located. The high standard of these schools is attested by the fact that the University of North Carolina admits their graduates to the Freshman class without examination. We commend each of these schools to the care and support of this Conference.

Westminster Theological Seminary is the only school of Theology within the reach of our young men. The character of this institution, both as to scholarship and orthodoxy, is beyond criticism. We need have no fear of tainting our young men with infidelity by sending them to Westminster Theological Seminary. We, therefore, heartily commend this splendiid school to the most liberal support of this Conference.

We recommend our own schools to the patronage of our people Western Maryland College offers free tuition to ministerial students and children of Methodist Protestant ministers. Our own conference schools, Yadkin Collegiate Institute, and Denton High School, make the same offer. Westminster Theological Seminary gives free tuition to young men preparing for the ministry.

We recommend that letter referred to us by this Annual Conference from Prof. T. S. Garrison be referred to the committee on Ways and Means.

We recommend that letter from Oak Ridge Institute referred to us by this Annual Conference be printed in Conference Minutes.

We do not believe that this Conference should cease its efforts to establish a College within our bounds. The hope for such an institution is still strong in the hearts of many of our people, and the prospects were perhaps never brighter than at present. We, therefore, endorse the following resolutions referred to us by this Annual Conference:

Whereas, the late J. C. Roberts bequeathed the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars to aid in the establishment of a college for the Methodist Protestant Church in North Carolina on the condition that the college be built before the year 1920; and,

Whereas, the most practicable if not the only practicable, way to meet the conditions necessary to secure this bequest for the object named seems to be through a combination of our Publishing and College enterprises, therefore be it resolved—

- 1. That we request the Trustees of the Methodist Protestant Publishing House to secure an amendment to their charter permitting and authorizing them to enlarge the scope of their operations to include the college enterprise, making such change of name of corporation and number of Trustees as may seem to them most fitting and that they report their action to the next Annual Conference for approval
- 2. That the consent of all contributors to all funds for both the Publishing and College enterprises be and is hereby asked to this new arrangement.
- 3. That the land bought in the suburbs of Greensboro for a college site be conveyed as soon as practicable by the present Trustees to the Trustees of the Methodist Protestant Publishing House to be used for a college site or sold for the benefit of the college as the Trustees may find best when the time comes to begin building.

REPORT NO. 16-CHILDREN'S HOME.

Dear Brethren: The Trustees of the Methodist Protestant Children's Home beg leave to submit the following report of the financial condition of said Home for the information of this body to become a part of the permanent records of the proceedings of this Conference:

The total cost of the Home, for grounds and building, has been \$27,703.45. There has been raised and paid on this amount \$15,216.-65, leaving a debt of \$12,586.77. This amount is partially covered by unpaid pledges amounting to \$3,927.36.

We would request that this Conference approve of the policy of many of our Sunday schools in giving at least one collection each month to the support of the Home and that you urge all our schools to do the same.

We submit herewith the report of the Superintendent of the Home. Respectfully submitted.

J. R. Reitzel, Secretary. REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF CHILDREN'S HOME TO BOARD TRUSTEES.

I beg leave to hand you a report from Aug. 1, 1913, to Nov: 20, 1913: The time has been too short for the accomplishment of the large tasks that have been before us, though we feel much has been done in getting the grounds cleaned off and the necessary buildings erected.

We opened the Home August 1st with six children present and now we have an enrollment of 25. Three have been returned to their guardian: Sixteen of the number had been in the Denton Orphanage. One has been converted since entering the Home. Nine are members of the church. One boy is sixteen years old to-day, one girl is fifteen years, two fourteen years, one boy fifteen years. The youngest are twin boys four years old. Only four not old enough to be in school:

August 4th, Mrs. Fannie E. Page who had had charge of the children at Denton was taken to the hospital at High Point to be treated for typhoid fever. August 12th, the services of Miss Martha

Redding were secured, and she has proved to be a most efficient helper.

We have had no serious sickness among the children.

Every Sunday the children attend Sunday school and preaching at North Main Street M. P. Church. Through the kindness of Dr. J. R. Reitzel in loaning the Home his horse the small children are carried to S. S. and church in an excellent four-seated hack purchased through the untiring efforts of Mrs. A. G. Dixon.

The children are making good grades in school and are noted for their excellent behavior. The boys are interested in farming. They are planning to enter the Boys' Corn-growing Contest.

Some of our churches and Sunday schools contribute regularly and liberally, some occasionally, and some not at all.

The Asheboro Woman's Home Missionary Society, Grace Church Woman's Home Missionary Society, Greensboro, and Miss Mary Young, Henderson, each clothe one girl. Mr. E. W. Freeze, of High Point, has obligated to clothe two boys. Dr. J. R. Reitzel gives his services as physician in the Home and Dr. J. W. Austin, a specialist for the eye, ear, nose and throat, will do work in his line gratis. Dr. Austin is a member of another denomination.

I have received in cash \$681.85: disbursed, \$625:06. Balance on hand, \$56.79. H. A. Garrett, Superintendent.

REPORT NO. 17-BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

We recommend the following appropriations toward the salaries for the past year to be paid out of funds now in the hands of the Treasurer: T. H. Matthews, Denton, \$200; C. W. Bates, Asheville, \$70; T. A. Plyler, Rockingham, (additional), \$50;

We recommend the following appropriations toward salaries for the ensuing year: Chatham Circuit, \$80; Welch Memorial, provided they pay \$200 on the parsonage debt, \$200; Reidsville, provided they pay \$300 on parsonage debt, \$200; Pensacola, provided the church is improved or new church built, \$100; Graham, with the understanding that amount will be reduced \$100 next year, \$250; Denton, \$200; St: Paul, \$125.

We recommend the following appropriations toward church buildings and church debts: Shelby, provided the church pays balance of debt in full, \$75; Lincolnton, provided the church pays balance of debt in full, \$50; Thomasville, provided substantial payment is made on debt, \$50; Franklinsville, on debt, \$50; St John, Rockingham; provided balance of debt is raised locally and the property placed at the disposal of this Conference through its incorporated Board of

Trustees, \$150; Mechanicsville, provided the church raises \$300 on debt, \$125; Denton; provided the church raises \$200 on debt, \$100; Cid, \$25; Asheville; provided the Board of Home Missions loans \$2,000, \$2;000: (This appropriation to be made upon condition that the Asheville people raise and expend upon the building \$2,000 without any obligations being incurred by the church.)

The following places have been brought to the attention of the Board: Charlotte, Roanoke Rapids, Weldon; Stokesdale; Pomona Mills; and King. We recommend that the Board be authorized to take such action as it may deem expedient when a definite proposition shall be submitted from these points.

The work of Church Extension is perhaps the most important work before the North Carolina Conference, because the advancement of the Methodist Protestant Church in North Carolina depends to a great extent upon the faithfulness with which we work Church Extension. For about fifteen years this Conference has undertaken to do Church Extension work on a much larger scale than before that time. The Board is called upon from year to year to do far more than it has ever had funds to do. New fields are continually opening up, and urgent calls are made upon the Board for more help than it can give; hence this Committee would urge upon the members of this Conference the necessity of raising every cent of the assessment for Church Extension and of raising it early in the year. The brethren who serve Church Extension fields need at least a part of the help promised them early in the Conference year. We insist that within the first three months of the Conference year this offering be taken. We commend the resolution adopted by this Conference last year, and in this way call attention to it again: "That in the future all money turned over to this Board for distribution be applied to Church Extension proper; that is, to build and maintain church enterprises only, that have been thoroughly investigated by a committee appointed by the Board and approved by the President of the Annual Conference."

The Board being thus directed by the Conference, we recommend that said Board continue its policy of trying to turn its attention to new fields which are calling for help. Fields that are established to be scaled down on as rapidly as conditions will permit.

We appreciate also the fraternal spirit manifested by the ministers of the various denominations represented in High Point, and have enjoyed their friendly interest in the work of this Conference.

REPORT NO. 25-SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

In view of the fact that the great work which has been and is being accomplished through the Sunday school organization in training and molding the character of the young people and children; also the development of the religious life of our older people, it being a well-known fact that more than ninety per cent. of the additions to the evangelical churches come direct from the Sunday-school, the Sunday school being the nursery of the church and source of spiritual life: we therefore recommend—

- 1. That pastors keep in close touch with the Sunday school work of their charges and that they lend their influence as general super-intendent to every phase of the Sunday school work, keeping in touch with all the officers and teachers.
- 3. That we use the Bible more in our Sunday-school work, and that it be studied as a medium through which God speaks to man.
- 3. In view of the fact that the Sunday school is in need of more efficient teaching, this being the cause of the failure to hold the masses in the Sunday school, we urge the necessity of a Teacher Training Class, and therefore call the attention of pastors and superintendents to the most excellent literature gotten out by our Board of Young People's Work, consisting of Cradle Roll, Home Department, Organized Bible Classes, Teachers' Training, Graded Lessons, Missionary Instruction and Offerings, Temperance Lessons, Decision Day, School Assessments for the Board of Young People's Work.
- 4. We therefore call attention to the free literature furnished by our Young People's Board.
- 5. We urge that pastors and Sunday school workers keep in close relationship with organized work of the State, attending or sending representatives to each State Sunday School Convention, and that our Board of Young People's Work be asked for literature to be put on exhibit at our State Sunday School Convention.

REPORT NO. 27—PASTORAL WORK.

Pastoral work, when so defined as to include all that a faithful pastor should do, reveals at once how utterly impossible it is for any man to attempt such duties trusting in his own wisdom and strength. The preparation for the pulpit ministry alone is enough to appall any one when viewed in the light of the utter lack of wisdom and training of the average minister. The making of sermons from week to week requires the best of brain, body and soul. No brain cell or center should be exempt from service in this strenuous work. Then when the time for the delivery of the message comes, all that is vital in the minister should be summoned to enforce it with all the power of his personality. No pastor who has the faintest conception of the responsibility resting upon him will enter the pulpit with flippant confidence that he is sufficient for this task.

Since the duties of the pastor are such as to require him to be in close touch with the entire community life in which he resides he must live much among his people. He should know them in their business and social as well as religious life. To do this he must visit them much in their homes and places of business.

Pastoral visiting is a subject which is much discussed, and its real value is known to every successful pastor. We sometimes hear the question, What is a pastoral visit? The answer is, Any visit which a pastor may make. It may be made for the purpose of rallying the people to the attendance upon the church services. It may be made for purely social purposes, or for prayer and admonition, instruction or encouragement. The particular purpose is not so important. But the pastor should have a purpose in going, in staying at, and leaving the home.

Let the pastor feel the magnitude of the work committed to his care, let him see how keenly his entire conduct is watched, and he will be more observant of the opportunity for sowing good seed, and preventing the growth of misunderstanding among his people.

tor urge upon his people the importance of Christian Endeavor and that he try to organize societies where there are none. We are glad to state that the Board of Young People's Work will gladly furnish helps to all Christian Endeavor workers.

REPORT NO. 29-TEMPERANCE.

Your committee has heard with pleasure the report of the Anti-Saloon League brought to us by Rev. R. L. Davis, Supt. We rejoice to know that temperance sentiment is growing throughout state and nation. The battle for law enforcement is gaining ground in all prohibition territory, and in license-states the saloon territory is decreasing. It seems that Virginia, Kentucky, Washington, Idaho and Texas will soon join the nine prohibition states, and that nation-wide prohibition will come within the next ten years.

We believe that North Carolona ought to prohibit liquors being shipped into the state. And since the Webb law provides that the state can control in this matter, we appeal to our law-makers to prohibit such at the next General Assembly. In this connection we are glad to note that Burke, Macon, Rutherford, Mitchell and Avery counties and High Point township and two or three others have already prohibited the importation of liquors.

We believe that the Federal Government ought to refuse to issue liquor-license to any person or corporation in dry territory. We understand that a bill to remedy this will be introduced in Congress this winter, and respectfully petition our representatives and Senators to support such. We are in hearty accord with the movement for national prohibition which was launched at the national Anti-Saloon League convention which recently met at Columbus, Ohio, and we assure the Anti-Saloon League of our hearty support in pressing this battle. We are in hearty accord with the Anti-Saloon League in the work it is doing in this state. We commend its literature and and its speakers to our people, and urge them to give moral and financial support. We have faith in its Supt., Rev. R. L. Davis, and assure him of our loyalty.

REPORT NO. 31—SUFFRAGE REGULATION

The committee appointed to formulate a suffrage regulation according to the suggestion of the president in his report to this Conference beg leave to submit the following:

That in all elections held in the local churches in the N. C. District, all members eighteen years old and older shall have

the right to vote, except in the election of Trustees and in the purchase and sale of church property only members twenty-one years of age and older shall be permitted to vote.

COMMITTEE.

REPORT NO. 32-WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE.

It is an evident fact that we need a better and more uniform system for collecting the pastor's salary and the general interests of the church.

We therefore recommend the following for your consideration and adoption, and that the same be put into practice as rapidly as possible:

First—That each church appoint or elect a committee whose duty shall be to apportion the pastor's salary and general interests, assessing each individual member.

Second—We believe that children members of the church should be assessed in their own name, notwithstanding the fact that the parents do the paying.

Third—In making this apportionment a sufficient amount should be added to cover the supposed deficit in collection. That each member be notified early in the year of his or her part.

Fourth—A card with something like the following on it would be nice for this:

NOTICE

Apportionment Card, 1914.

Dear Brother or Sister (name):

Your assessment for pastor is \$_____. Please pay monthly if you can.

For general interest is \$_____.

Yours truly,

COMMITTEE.

Fifth—We recommend that one set of stewards be appointed for the collection of general interests; or when thought best one set of stewards can collect for both.

Sixth—We urge that each steward insist on the importance of monthly payments.

Seventh—We insist that each pastor present this plan to his first Quarterly Conference and to each of his churches, and insist that they use the plan, provided an effectual plan is not already in operation that reaches each member.

Eighth—This plan has been ratified by the Annual Conference of which your pastor and delegate are a part.

THE CHILDREN'S HOME

We recommend that each pastor see to it that an Orphan Home day be observed in each church, at which time a program suggested by the Executive Committee of the Woman's Home Missionary Society may be used, the claims of the Orphans' Home presented and an offering taken. The time for holding the day being left to the Quarterly Conference.

- 2. Believing that it is most important that the children of the church and Sunday school be interested in the Orphan's Home, we recommend that collections be taken once a month in each Sunday school for the benefit of the Home.
- 3. We recommend the organization of Woman's Home Missionary Societies, Young People's Societies, and Children's Mission Bands, where it is at all possible; and where it is not possible, that one to three ladies be appointed by the pastor at each church whose duty it shall be to solicit offerings in cash and supplies of such things as can be profitably used in the home, and that the pastor report the names of the committee to the Superintendent of the Home.
- 4. Resolved: That each church hold a service in the interest of the Home, taking a collection, on Thanksgiving day or the Sunday preceding or following.
- 5. That this report be published in the *Methodist Protestant* Herald in the months of May and October, accompanied by one or more articles under the supervision of the chairman of the Executive Committee of the Woman's Home Missionary Society.
- 6. That all money and supplies be turned over to H. A. Garrett, High Point, N. C.

SERVICE IN MEMORY OF OUR HONORED DEAD. On Sunday afternoon, Nov. 23, 1913, at High Point, N. C., occurred a most impressive memorial service, President C. A. Cecil presiding. Obituaries were read as follows: Rev. P. D. Moore by Rev. J. H. Moton, Rev. John W. Heath by Rev. T. F. McCulloch; Rev. J. E. Hartsell by Rev. D. A. Highfill. After these papers were read a number of beautiful tributes were pald to these brethren by members of the Conference.

REV. JAMES E. HARTSELL.

BY REV. D. A. HIGHFILL

Rev. James E. Hartsell was born in Stanly county, N. C., on Oct. 30, 1841. His parents brought up a large family. One of his sisters married Rev. Henry Garmon, and is the mother of Rev. H. D. Garmon.

During the trouble between the States Bro. Hartsell enlisted as a soldier and served in the Confederate army. Later he moved to Maryland and worked in a bakery in Baltimore. It was here that he met and married Miss Annie Morn, a lady who came from Ireland. In his family were eight children, seven of whom survive him. One of his sons is Rev. II. J. Hartsell of Seattle, Washington, and another, Dr. W. K. Hartsell, resides in Greensboro, N. C.

At one time Bro. Hartsell was engaged in the mercantile business at Locust Level, in Stanly county. It was at this period of his life that he began his ministerial career, and preached for a while on Monroe circuit. Later he was assigned to Cleveland circuit, where he remained nine years. His next charge was Buncombe circuit, the next Tabernacle where he remained for six years, from thence he went to Lincoln circuit, and his last charge was Vance circuit.

At the Annual Conference held at Liberty in 1908 his health was so impaired that he requested to be placed on the superannuate list. He moved to Seattle, Washington, and spent a year with his son. He returned to North Carolina somewhat invigorated by the year's rest from the regular work, and would have taken up active work had the Conference needed his services at a place where it was practicable for him to go.

He now located at Toluca, in Lincoln county, near the home of his daughter, Mrs. Andy Sain, and engaged in the mercantile business. He remained at this place until his death, which occurred Dec. 12, 1912. In his last years he would frequently preach at the different churches that were in reach, and assisted in special meet-

age at a number of places

One who knew him well has said: "I esteemed Bro. Hartsell very highly, and looked upon him as an earnest, fervent, faithful, and an eminently useful preacher. And he was certainly highly esteemed in social life. I am satisfied that he was one of the most patient men I have ever known. I am glad to have known him, glad to have been his friend and to have had his friendship and Christian love."

Another brother says: "Bro. Hartsell was one of the most congenial men I ever knew. As a friend and a companion in the work of the ministry I think that his superior would be exceedingly hard to find. He was always so agreeable, yet always firm for the right. His preaching was of a character to lift one up to a higher life. At times, as a successful man in persuading the lost to accept Christ, I have never seen his equal."

REV. JOHN W. HEATH.

Rev. John W. Heath passed from earth to heaven on Februaary 4, 1913, at the advanced age of a little more than eighty-six years, having been born January 8, 1827, in the southeastern part of Guilford county near the iteath mine on Beaver Creek. It is an interesting fact that that the name of his father, William Heath, appears in Paris' listory of the Methodist Protestaant Charen as having figured in some of the very beginnings of Methodist Protestant Instory at Moriah church (now Tabelhacle Circuit).

The runeral was at Tabernacle church

The writer is not informed as to Bro. Heath's earlier educational advantages. In a letter written in 1856 to his under in the West he states that he was teaching at the time, but would re-enter school at Alamance Academy as soon as his school closed, and pursue his studies preparatory to entering the ministry, theorogy being the most important study.

In October, 1852, he was married to Martha Jane Hardin, daughter of John Landen. To this union was born one son, narris Heath, who with his wife and daughter still survive. Having lived together for nearly sixty years, the one-time bride of his young manhood but now aged wife preceded him to the glory world only

in July of last year.

It was in this same year, 1852, that he joined the North Carolina Conference, Methodist Protestant Church, in Fayetteville. His first work was Catawba, now Lincoln circuit. He was a terward assigned as follows: 1853, Randolph as assistant; 1856-57, Mocksville; 1858-9, Grange; 1860, Davidson; 1861, no work; 1862, Guilford; 1863, no work; 1864-5, Asheboro circuit; 1866, Alamance; 1867-8, Asheboro circuit; 1869-70, Alamance; 1871, Mocksville; 1872-3, Greensboro circuit; 1874, without work at his own request; 1875, Orange; 1876, no record found; 1877, Greensboro as assistant; 1878-80, Asheboro circuit; 1881, Haw River; 1882, without work at his own request; 1883-4. Haw River; 1885, found no report of stationary committee; 1886, no work; 1887-8, Belmont; 1880, name omitted from report; 1890-91, without appointment at his own request; 1892-5, supernumerary on Tabernacle circuit; 1904 to his death superannuated

For a number of years Bro. Heath was not able to attend Conference or church services, but never to the last lost interest in the

church and what was being done to extend the kingdom

He was ordained Diacon by the North Carolina Conference Nov. 5, 1856. Rev. C. F. Harris having signed as president and Rev. Wm. H. Wills as secretary. To was ordained Elder by the same Conference in 1858, Rev. A. W. Lineberry having signed as president and Rev. A. C. Marris as secretary.

REV. P. D. MOORE.

BY REV. J. H. MOTON

Rev. P. D. Moore was born in Rutherfordton county May 13, 1824, departed this life Feb. 16th, 1943, aged 85 years, 9 months and 3 days. He professed religion when in h.s. 18th year and joined the M. E. Chnrch, South; was licensed to preach in said church when he was 24 years old, and traveled in the M. E. Church as pastor for a number of years.

Bro. Moore was united in marriage to Miss Phoebe Grigg March 21st, 1849. To this union were born five children, two now living and three dead. The eldest son is preaching in Florida and the other is a farmer. This union was broken by death August 22nd, 1867. After a process of time he was again married—to Miss Parmelia B. Waters; to this union were born four children, one now dead and three living. One son is an engineer in mansas, another is in business in Bluefield, W. Va.,, and the other is a telegraph

operator at White Sulphur Springs, Va.

Bro. Moore joined the M. P. Church and was received as a minister at the 4th quarterly conference of Cleveland Ct. in 1887, during the pastorate of Rev. J. E. Hartsell, who preceded him but a short while to the spirit land, and traveled with Bro Hartsell as an associate pastor in 1888. He joined the North Carolina Annual Conference in the fall of 1888 and served the following charges: Catawba Ct., 1889-90; Caldwell Ct., 1891-94. We have no record of 1895, perhaps he lived on at Rutherford College. In the hands of the president, 1896; 1vy Ct., 1897-90; was superannuated 1900; again served Gastonia Ct., 1902; was superannuated on Caldwell Ct., 1903-04.

Bro Moore was a man loved by all who knew him because of his piety and patience; truly he bore hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. As a minister he was faithful, and was a good preacher of the old time Methodist type. He always preached the gospel in its purity and simplicity and received but little for his labor, and yet never complained. In the loss of Bro. Moore the Conference and church have lost a good man, and the children a faithful father; but our loss is his eternal gain. Just a few weens before his death the doctor told him that he was liable to drop dead at any moment, and he looked at him without any anxiety and said, "You cannot scare me, I'm ready." We would here extend our heartfelt sympathy to the relatives and children; especially to the adopted daughter who remained with him until the last and did all in her power to comfort him as he went down the western slope to the crossing. So as we go one by one doubtless Bro. Moore will be among the first to greet us.

"Jesus, while our hearts are bleeding, O'er the spoils that death hath won, We would at this solemn meeting, Calmly say, 'Thy will be done,' By thy hand the boon was given, Thou hast taken but thine own:
Lord of earth, and God of Heaven, Evermore, 'Thy will be done,'"
