Called Meeting

Winston-Salem, N. C., June 19, 1930.

Pursuant to the following call the Presbytery of Winston-Salem met in the First Presbyterian Church of Winston-Salem:

Pilot Mountain, N. C., June 4, 1930.

“The Constitutional requirements having been complied with, the Winston-Salem Presbytery is hereby called to meet in the First Presbyterian Church of Winston-Salem on Thursday, June 19th, at 10:30 A. M. for the following business:

1. To receive Candidate J. W. Foster from Concord Presbytery, examine him for license and arrange for his ordination if the way be clear.
2. To receive Candidate Herman Womeldorf from Lexington Presbytery, examine him for license, and arrange for his ordination if the way be clear.
3. To transact any business that may arise out of the above.

J. D. SMITH, Moderator.”

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator and was opened with prayer led by Dr. D. Clay Lilly. The following ministers were present: Revs. R. L. Berry, W. T. Baker, J. S. Foster, D. D., J. R. McGregor, D. C. Lilly, D. D., R. H. Stone, J. D. Smith and J. P. Taylor. Elder G. A. Grimsley, of Winston-Salem First, was enrolled.

Rev. J. P. Taylor was elected clerk.

Mr. J. W. Foster was received as a candidate for the ministry from Concord Presbtery. Mr. Herman J. Womeldorf was received from Lexington Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry.

It was moved and seconded that the two candidates be examined with a view to licensure.

Mr. Womeldorf's diplomas from Washington and Lee University and Union Theological Seminary were accepted instead of an examination on languages, Church History and Philisophy.

In regard to Mr. Foster it was determined, in lieu of college training, that he be examined under the extraordinary clause.

Mr. Womeldorf's examinations in Theology, Sacraments and Church History were sustained as satisfactory. The similar examinations for Mr. Foster were sustained as satisfactory.

Each presented their Presbyterial parts which were placed in hands of committees who found them worthy of commendation. Mr. Womeldorf gave the outline of his sermon from Rom. 1:16. The whole of the examination of Mr. Womeldorf was sustained as satisfactory.

Mr. Foster gave a sermon outline of John 10:10. Following this his examination was sustained as satisfactory.

Candidate Womeldorf having answered the Constitutional Questions in the affirmative was duly ordained an evangelist in the Presbytery of Winston-Salem.

Candidate Foster was to be ordained by a commission to meet in the Church at Cooleemee at a date to be determined by Mr. Foster and the Commission. The Moderator appointed the following on the Commission to ordain and install Mr. Foster:

Rev. J. R. McGregor to preside and preach the sermon.

Rev. W. T. Baker to charge to pastor.

Rev. Herman Womeldorf to be alternate to Rev. W. T. Baker, or Mr. G. W. Mountcastle.

Elder I. P. Graham

Elder G. W. Mountcastle to charge the congregation.

A call for the pastoral services of Mr. J. W. Foster from the Cooleemee Church was found in order by the Presbytery and was placed in Mr. Foster's hands. Mr. Foster accepted the call.

The following resolution was adopted:

The Presbytery of Winston-Salem having heard with grief of the death of our brother and fellow-worker, George W. Lee, that we hereby express to his family and congregation our heartfelt sympathy in this great bereavement, and that we hereby appoint Rev. J. R. McGregor to attend his funeral service on Friday and bear in person to them this message.

The Moderator appointed Dr. D. Clay Lilly to prepare a memorial to be read at Synod.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer.

FALL MEETING

Danbury, N. C., Sept. 9, 1930.

The Presbytery of Winston-Salem met in its Fifteenth Stated Meeting in the Presbyterian Church of Danbury at 11:00 A. M.

The opening sermon was preached by our retiring Moderator, Rev. J. D. Smith, who used as his text Phil. 3:14, 15. The Presbytery was constituted with prayer led by Dr. John S. Foster.

Rev. R. H. Stone was elected Moderator and Rev. J. W. McFall, Temporary Clerk.

The Minutes of the last Called Meeting, June 19th, were read as information.

Rev. H. W. Hudspeth suggested the hours for the meeting and adjournment of Presbytery as follows: Tuesday, adjourn for lunch at 12:30. Meet at 1:30 P. M. and adjourn at will. Meet at 7:45 P. M. and adjourn at will. Wednesday, meet at 9:00 A. M. and adjourn at will.

Rev. Mr. Hartsfield, a Methodist minister, was introduced to the Presbytery and invited to sit as a visiting brother.

Presbytery adjourned for lunch to meet at 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Presbytery opened at 2:00 P. M. with a hymn and was then led in prayer by Rev. R. W. George.

A communication in regard to the Congress on World Missions, to be held in Chattanooga, Tenn., February 16-19, 1931, was read and referred to the Executive Committee on Foreign Missions. Mr. Alan Craig led Presbytery in prayer for this movement.

A call from the George W. Lee Memorial Presbyterian Church for the ministerial services of Rev. C. E. Clarke was referred to the Committee on Calls and Supplies.

The report of the Commission to install Rev. C. E. Clarke as Assistant Pastor of the George W. Lee Memorial was given, adopted, and is as follows:

REPORT OF COMMISSION TO INSTALL REV. C. E. CLARKE AS ASSISTANT PASTOR AT THE GEORGE W. LEE MEMORIAL CHURCH

Your Commission reports that on April 27th, 1930, we met at the George W. Lee Memorial Church—and the meeting was opened with prayer. The usual devotional exercise was held—after which Rev.

J. S. Foster, D. D., preached the sermon and Rev. D. Clay Lilly, D. D., propounded the Constitutional questions.

Following this a charge was delivered to the congregation by Rev. George W. Lee, and a charge to the pastor by Ruling Elder Charles M. Norfleet—after which the service was concluded with prayer and benediction.

The report of the Committee on Nominations was made by Dr. D. Clay Lilly and is as follows:—"Rev. J. W. Foster be made Chairman of the Executive Committee on Orphan's Home. Other committees to remain the same." The report was adopted.

The Committee on Calls and Supplies found the call from the George W. Lee Memorial Church for the services of Rev. C. E. Clarke to be in order and recommend that it be placed in the hands of Rev. C. E. Clarke. The report was adopted.

Rev. C. E. Clarke notified Presbytery of his acceptance of the call.

The Committee on Schools and Colleges gave an oral report as information for Presbytery.

The Committee on Bible Cause submitted the following report which was read and adopted:

"Your Committee on Bible Cause would respectfully submit the following report:

"The American Bible Society is now 114 years old and has issued over two hundred and sixteen million copies of the Bible, Testament, and portions of the Bible. The Bible has now been translated in whole or in part into eight hundred and eighty six languages and dialects.

"During the year 1929 there was an increase in the work done by this Society over the preceding year. From its presses were issued over eleven million one hundred thousand copies of the Scriptures. These issues were in 179 languages and dialects. There were 89,254 volumes issued for the blind.

"We are glad again to report that there has been again this year an increase in the contributions from our Presbytery to this most

worthy cause. There has been an increase in our gifts over each previous year now for several years.

“The Bible is the Book of Books. It is God’s Book. It is the infallible and indestructible Word of God. It has been studied and taught and read in homes, in Bible Schools, Sabbath Schools and in Christian Chautauquas this year as never before.

“The Bible is God’s message to the fallen race and the greatest need of the world is a knowledge of the Word of God, therefore we urge that we continue our gifts to this most worthy cause and that our prayers go with our gifts.

The Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief submitted the following report, which was read and adopted:

Your Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief begs to submit the following report:

The most important task which confronts your committee at the present time is the Minister’s Annuity Fund.

Presbytery has endorsed the plan for three years, now is the time for action. The General Assembly’s Executive Committee of Christian Education and Ministerial Relief will put on a drive in the Synod of North Carolina during the Month of October in an endeavor to raise our proportionate part of the three million dollars necessary to begin the Minister’s Annuity Fund.

Your Committee recommends:

1. Each minister strive to secure endorsement of his elders and deacons.
2. Each minister preach or have preached a sermon on the Minister’s Annuity Fund between now and the middle of October.
3. That ministers co-operate with Dr. Sweet’s Committee in helping to put across the Minister’s Annuity Fund.

REV. GEORGE W. LEE

Rev. George W. Lee was born in Florence, S. C., in 1874 and departed this life June 18, 1930, at Winston-Salem, N. C. His boyhood was spent at Florence.

His first experiences as an adult were in the business world. He was in the express business at Mt. Airy, N. C., and later worked with one of the banks of that city.

He gave evidence in early life of the deep piety and sincere religious fervor which characterized his life work.

As a young man he was made an elder in the Mt. Airy church.

He manifested a singular attachment for all young people. He was especially interested in boys. He gathered a group of boys together at Mt. Airy, and led them into many religious activities.

His work attracted attention and he was invited to Winston-Salem to assist Dr. Neal L. Anderson in his work. He was to labor in the mission in the northern part of the city, and to assist in the Sunday School work at the First Presbyterian church. These activities were greatly blessed.

At the same time Brother Lee was studying under the direction of Dr. Anderson. After a little while the work in North Winston had grown to where a church was organized, known as the North Presbyterian Church, and George W. Lee was ordained to the ministry and became the pastor of this new church. For twenty-one years he labored in Winston-Salem. He was frequently called to other churches, but always declined them and remained with the church which was the only pastorate of his ministry.

He was the friend of the poor. He spent his life in unremitting toil. He was the visitor, the friend, and the comforter in the homes of the poor and the friendless. He was "big brother" to boys of every kind; and in particular to boys who had fallen into temptation and a snare. He went with them to the court and sat by them in the trial. He was the best friend to delinquent boys in the whole city. He was instrumental in having the juvenile court established in Winston-Salem. His recommendation was often accepted, in the case of a delinquent boy, by the solicitor and the trial judge. He loved boys and they loved him. His success in working with them was unique and wonderful.

He so endeared himself to his people that even before his death they insisted in changing the name of their church from the "North Church" to the "George W. Lee Memorial Church."

He held a large place in the confidence and love of the whole city. People of every church and of no church were his friends. He was one of the best loved men of the city of Winston-Salem. His influence extends throughout his Presbytery, and the entire Synod of North Carolina. He was the friend of all our orphanages and of all our schools; of Home Missions and Foreign Missions; of Christian Education and of all the organized work of the church.

He labored incessantly, and spent himself without reck or heed. When a friend remonstrated with him about this he said, "I expect to live hereafter."

He lives now in the manifold fruits of his labors, in young men and women who, but for him, would not have had an education and in many redeemed and developed lives—led to Christ by his patient and devoted labors.

The news of his death filled the city with sadness. His funeral was very largely attended—not more than one third of the people being able to crowd into the church. Every token of love for him was shown on every hand.

His memory will be cherished for many years. His name will endure through coming generations, because his people, in their love for him, have conferred his name on the George W. Lee Memorial Church.

This memorial, read by Dr. D. Clay Lilly. Was adopted by a rising vote, followed by prayer. It was ordered spread upon the minutes of Presbytery and a copy to be sent to the family of our departed friend and fellow-worker.

Various members of the Presbytery gave testimony of the worth and value of Mr. Lee's ministry among us.

Rev. C. W. Ervin was enrolled as a member of Presbytery.

Dr. Foster submitted the report of the Committee on Assembly's Home Missions, which was read and adopted. It follows:

REPORT ON ASSEMBLY'S HOME MISSIONS

Home Missions is the church in action. It is the agency by which the church and the school are carried to needy communities and to the underprivileged classes of our own country. The peril of America is sin. The need of America is the Gospel.

For more than a half century Assembly's Home Missions has led the vanguard of the Home Mission forces of our church. The extent and variety of the Assembly's Home Mission operations will be understood when it is known that this Committee is preaching and teaching the Gospel in twelve languages in about 1200 communities in the 16 States which comprise our General Assembly.

Our Presbytery is a beneficiary of Assembly's Home Missions. Her hand of help has always been held out to us to the limit of her resources. This help was made possible by the gifts of the stronger Presbyteries of the church who were willing to share their strength with us. It has now come to pass that some of the Presbyteries that once helped us, because of a distressing financial depression, are now asking the Assembly's Committee for assistance.

Although our Presbytery has its own burdens and is in need of aid, surely this is the time when we should be willing, to the limit of our ability, to help the Assembly's Committee answer these manifold calls. Never in the history of the Nation was there greater need for an enlarged Home Mission program. From the Indians, the Mountains, the Negroes, the Mexicans, from crowded cities and country fields, there is a call for Home Mission reinforcements.

This aggressive work of the Assembly is being retarded by an inadequate income for the support of its manifold activities. In four years \$119,577.00 have been cut from the appropriations to the fields. Because of a decreasing Home Mission income a crippling Home Mission debt has been incurred. On April 1, 1930, the bank debt was \$91,000.00. This is the largest debt in the history of the Assembly's work. The Executive Committee has resolved that the debt must be paid. If the receipts are not sufficient to do this, the amount will be taken from the appropriations to the Presbyteries and Missions. The Executive Committee feels that this would be disastrous, and earnestly asks the whole church to consider this problem as their own.

In view of such an emergency, the General Assembly has instructed the Executive Committee to present its needs to the church in November—Assembly's Home Mission month,—and appeal for a supplemental offering that the hampering debt resting upon the Committee may be removed and this aggressive missionary agency of the church be enabled to go forward to still greater conquests for the Kingdom of God.

The following recommendations are offered:

1. That Presbytery pledge to the Executive Committee of Home Missions its fullest co-operation in meeting this critical financial situation.

2. That Presbytery urge all pastors and stated supplies to present the varied work and the urgent needs of Assembly's Home Missions and ask for a generous supplemental offering in November,—the Home Mission month,—to meet the emergency now confronting this Committee.

3. That Presbytery urge every pastor and stated supply to use Home Mission topics at their prayer meeting services in November, using the Assembly's Home Mission text-book, "Near Neighbors," as the basis of their study.

4. That Presbytery urge all Auxiliaries and Societies to observe November 9-16 as the annual Week of Prayer and Self-denial for Home Missions.

5. That Presbytery now engage in earnest prayer asking God to supply the need of this great Committee at this time of its multiplied opportunities and obligations.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was submitted by Rev. J. K. Fleming and was adopted and is as follows:

The Committee on Stewardship in submitting its report would call attention to the fact that this Church Year has been designated for special emphasis on Proportionate giving. For this idea to be definitely put into practice there must be the dedication not only of substance, but also of life to the will of the Saviour. We believe that the Church should feel that whatever program of work God has entrusted to it has in it the essential and important element of Evangelism.

Your Committee would offer the following recommendations:

1. That the date for the next Every Member Canvass be March 15, 1931.

2. That the month of February be designated "Stewardship Study Month."

3. That the Sunday prior to the Every Member Canvass be observed as a day of prayer in the interest of the whole work of our Church.

4. That sometime early in the month of February Presbytery be called into session for special prayer in the interest of the Every Member Canvass.

5. That the plan for the individual Church to pay each month one twelfth of its promised budget for benevolences be commended to all Churches within the Presbytery.

6. That the pastors and other Church leaders be urged to cooperate in the endeavor to secure subscriptions in every family for one of our Church Papers, and the "Presbyterian Survey."

7. That churches which did not make the Every Member Canvass last spring be urged to make the Canvass this fall.

"Rev. R. H. Stone to preside and propound the Constitutional questions; Rev. J. W. McFall to preach the sermon. Rev. H. W. Hudspeth to charge the congregation and Ruling Elder M. W. Norfleet to charge the pastor. The time to be the second Sunday of October at eleven o'clock."

The report was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Sabbath and Family Religion submitted by Rev. J. W. Luke, was adopted and follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH AND FAMILY RELIGION

Many reports are made giving figures to show improvement in one way or another. We read of large numbers of converts or larger amounts of money given, or more organizations set up. Each year we pat ourselves on the back and think how well we have done when we read the valuations. There are other thermometers which are true indicators of the quality of religion that exists within our churches. These indicators are—(1) How your members observe the Sabbath? (2) What is the religious tone of the home?

We are continually warned in God's Word against the careless use of the Sabbath. The breaking of the fourth Commandment leads to the breaking of the faith of many of our members. The fire does not burn that is not replenished.

Then there is the danger of the low religious tone of our homes. No matter how efficient the children are taught in the Sunday School's

yet six days at a home which has no religious atmosphere will cool all down.

I ask you several questions and I find that four or five think their congregations are increasing in careful use of the Sabbath. We find about four or five more that state the same about the development of religion in the home. We should not be too optimistic about this. From many observances we are not getting along as well as we think. We are patting ourselves on the back, and we are uncertain just how well we are doing spiritually.

On question most every minister in the Presbytery preach at least a sermon on these two subjects mentioned, Sabbath Keeping and Home Religion.

If the indicator of your car shows a discharge and loss of power we take warning. Our church I feel should watch to see whether our people are building up in spiritual power or discharging power.

The Committee suggests that ministers give special attention to the following suggestions:—

1. Preach sermons on Sabbath Observance and Religion in the Home.
2. Establish family prayers and grace at the table.
3. In pastoral calls lead the family in prayer.

Rev. J. R. McGregor, Commissioner to the General Assembly, reported his faithful attendance at all meetings of the Assembly. Presbytery adopted this report and commended him for his diligence.

The report of the Committee on Presbytery's Home Missions was read and adopted and is as follows:

REPORT OF HOME MISSION COMMITTEE

Your committee would commend the several ministers of our Presbytery who have most faithfully promoted the complete program adopted by Presbytery in its meeting April 9th. We would record again the goals we have adopted for ourselves:—

1. That every Church receiving support for its minister from any of our Home Mission funds, General Assembly's Home Missions,

Synod's Home Missions and Presbytery's Home Missions,—should have an Every Member Canvass and through the year make some contribution to these Home Mission agencies.

2. That every Church make an earnest effort to have a Daily Vacation Bible School and evangelistic campaign during the year.

3. That our ministers, workers, and elders, put forth diligent effort to organize Sunday Schools and open points for preaching services in their respective fields.

We have reported to us from the nine Churches or groups of Churches whose ministers receive support from some of our Home Mission Funds

Daily Vacation Bible Schools Conducted.....	15
Enrollment of Daily Vacation Bible School	1,163
Presbyterians enrolled in Daily Vacation Bible School	522
Revival campaigns conducted	17

There was one Sunday School organized and one Sunday School revived and reorganized. In all the Churches of the above groups there are only ten Young People's organizations with an enrollment of 266. It is earnestly hoped that there will be the organization of young people's work in several of the Churches in the near future. It is also expected that some of the Churches which have not had their Daily Vacation Bible School may yet be able to have one. We note with joy that Rev. J. J. Douglass has opened two preaching places in Alleghany County.

We would urge those Churches which have not made an Every Member Canvass to do so this fall.

Since the meeting of Presbytery Rev. J. W. Foster has become pastor of the Cooleemee Church. The opportunities for the Kingdom there are large and already there is marked progress under the leadership of Mr. Foster. Rev. J. J. Douglas continues to serve the Glade Valley Group most acceptably.

The pastor, Rev. J. K. Fleming, will move this month into the splendid new manse of the Thomasville Church. The Cooleemee Church plans to begin construction of their manse immediately. The Sparta Church will be remodeled this fall.

Our efficient treasurer, Mr. J. H. Thompson, reports our present deficit to be \$669.04. This compels us to ask all our ministers to urge our Churches to make generous provision for this part of our work. Because all of our groups are blessed with ministers, we will be in need of all the gifts asked of each Church.

The Minutes of the morning and afternoon sessions were read, corrected and approved.

Presbytery adjourned with prayer to meet at 7:30 P .M.

Tuesday Evening Session

Presytery opened with the singing of a hymn, after which Rev. C. W. Robinson read a passage of Scripture and led Presbytery in prayer.

Dr. John S. Foster preached our Communion sermen using as his text Gal. 6:14.

The Communion was administered by Rev. C. W. Robinson, Rev. J. R. McGregor and Ruling Elders W. F. Carter, E. P. Johnson.

Mr. A. M. Craig delivered an inspirational address on the mission work in Africa.

Rev. C. W. Robinson submitted the report of the Comunittee on Foreign Missions, which was read and adopted. It is as follows:

The Foreign Mission report we herewith submit is one of absolutely vital importance. In view of the facts to be presented, this Presbytery must take some definite action. What that action shall be the Presbytery itself must decide. The Foreign Mission Committee makes no recommendation. It believes it wisest to let the facts speak for themselves and to let the Presbytery, in the light of the facts, determine for itself the action required. Here, then, are the facts:—

On the foreign field the work is successful beyond precedent. Mission reports show an unparalleled willingness, and often eagerness, to hear the gospel. Especially in war-torn, bandit-ravaged China the people's extremity is proving God's opportunity. The Foreign Mission Committee has just received a most urgent letter from the North Kiangsu Mission, dated July 11, begging for 15 more evangelistic missionaries, five more doctors, and three more nurses, and saying:

“In every Station our present force is working to the limit of strength. Yet in our Mission are tens of thousands of absolutely untouched towns and villages, a large number of wall cities of from 25,000 to 100,000 in which

no work is done for lack of force to do the work. In one field, within a small area, there are 5,000 villages and in only 150 are there Christians living. In another field a missionary from one road counted in a distance of seven miles 256 untouched villages. We urge the necessity of large re-enforcements.

“The mass of the common people have never seemed as willing to listen to the gospel message as now.”

Turning from the work abroad to the situation at home, we note a startling contrast. For two and a half years receipts for the regular work have been steadily falling. Year before last they were the smallest in seven years. Last year they were smaller still. Up to August 1 of this current year they are \$16,716 smaller even than last year's receipt to the same date.

This decline is mainly due to the fact that five sixths of the Presbyteries have been reducing more and more their percentage allotments to the Assembly causes in order to answer the appeals of the more near-by causes in Synod, Presbytery, and local church. For this current year three fourths of the Synods, including the strongest Synods, have cut their allotted apportionments of Assembly causes by more than half a million dollars, apportioning the remainder to their Presbyteries. These Presbyteries are sadly apt in their turn to make additional cuts before apportioning to their local churches. And the local churches in their turn are only too apt to follow the example of their higher courts. Thus the great missionary work of our Church is being surely and swiftly strangled.

As regards the Foreign Mission cause, the difficulty due to dwindling receipts is augmented by the fact that in recent years the cost of everything that enters into Foreign Mission work has risen 25 per cent.

To meet this double difficulty our missionary force has been reduced from 516 to 425, a loss of 91.

But the question may be asked, Is not our Foreign Mission work as at present conducted too big for our Church? This question is answered by the fact that the actual cost of the regular work for this current year, \$1,217,629, is almost exactly the same as the average annual receipts for the regular work for the last seven years, showing that the work is not beyond the accustomed Foreign Mission giving of our people, to say nothing of what they are able to give.

Unless Synods, Presbyteries, and local churches increase their Foreign Mission percentages and gifts, the work cannot be sustained. The sharp decline of the last two and a half years has so undermined

its support that unless receipts take a tremendous upward turn before next April 1, there will be required the most drastic Foreign Mission cut ever known in our Church's history.

Shall our Lord's work be drastically cut, or our Church's gifts greatly increased? That is the question for the Presbytery to decide. We make no recommendation. We simply set before you the facts and ask for ACTION.

To use a Bible figure, there is your Foreign Mission work, unprecedently successful and blessed of God, yet, because of our Church's dwindling gifts, wounded, bleeding, growing steadily weaker and weaker. This Presbytery is certain to do one of two things. Either it will act the part of the Good Samaritan, or it will act the part of the Priest and Levite. Which shall it be?

Many subjects will come before you at this meeting. Among them is this subject worth the serious consideration of the Presbytery. Nay, is any other subject so worth its serious consideration? Certainly the Saviour would put it first. As a matter of fact with His last breath He **did** put it first. And our sainted forefathers, those great men of that first General Assembly of our Church, whom we may vision as seated with us today, would they put it first? Nay, they **did** put it first. Here are their own words:

“The General Assembly desires distinctly and deliberately to inscribe on our Church's banner as she now first unfurls it to the world, in immediate connection with the headship of her Lord, His last command, ‘Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature’, regarding this as the great end of her organization and obedience to it as the indispensable condition of her Lord's promised presence.”

So, whatever else this Presbytery may do, unless it does the utmost possible to set its great Foreign Mission work again upon the upward path, it will have failed, at the most vital point of all, in the eyes of our sainted fathers and our Lord Himself.

The above report is from the Central Executive Committee which makes no recommendations, but your Committee makes the following:

1. That in view of the desperately serious condition confronting our Foreign work, as set forth in this report, we urge that this report be read in every pulpit, and the whole service be one of prayer in behalf of our Foreign Mission work, and we also ask the people to plead for special blessings on “The Congress on World Missions” to be held in Chattanooga next February.

2. That Presbytery appoint a delegate to attend this "Congress" charged to bring a report of its findings to our meeting in the Spring.

3. That our Foreign work be kept continually before our Men's, Women's and Young People's Societies.

4. That the heads of families be asked to plead the cause of Foreign Missions in their family devotions.

5. That during January, the Foreign Mission month appointed by the Assembly, every church in our communion organize a Church School of Missions, using the approved Foreign Mission Study books for each age group and every pastor lay this great cause upon the hearts and consciences of his people.

6. That every church in the Presbytery be asked to observe January 25—Feb. 1, 1931, as the week of prayer and self-denial for Foreign Missions.

7. That at this time pastors be requested to preach upon this subject of Foreign Missions and take a supplementary offering for this cause to meet the large deficit on this work in accordance with the action of the General Assembly.

REPORT OF COMMISSION TO ORDAIN AND INSTALL REV. J.
W. FOSTER

The Commission appointed by Presbytery for the ordination to the Gospel ministry of licentiate John W. Foster met in the Cooleemee Presbyterian Church Sunday, July 6, at seven-thirty o'clock. The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. J. K. Fleming. Present, Rev. J. Rupert McGregor, Rev. J. K. Fleming, Rev. H. J. Womeldorf, and Elder I. P. Graham. Rev. H. J. Womeldorf was appointed clerk. The service of ordination began at eight o'clock. Rev. J. Rupert McGregor preached the sermon using as the text Ephesians 1:22. The Chairman explained the purpose of the commission and the nature of the ordination service. Licentiate John W. Foster was, according to our Book of Church Order, duly ordained to the Gospel ministry by the laying on of hands of the commission and prayer by Rev. J. Rupert McGregor. After satisfactory answers to the questions required by newly elected pastor and congregation the minister was declared to be duly elected, ordained and installed pastor of the Cooleemee Presbyterian Church. The report of the Committee on the Minutes of the General Assembly was made by Rev. John W. Luke. The report was read and adopted and is as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MINUTES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Wilmington, N. C., Oct. 16, 1930.

The Committee on Minutes of the General Assembly begs to render the following report after a careful perusal of the Assembly's Minutes. May we call the Presbytery's attention to the following suggestions and recommendations of the Assembly:—

1. On page 39 in the minutes of Assembly, the Report of the Standing Committee on Judicial Business recommends this—"The Assembly calls attention of the Presbyteries to the importance in such cases of observing carefully the law of the Church governing the installation of pastors."

2. On page 44, the Report of the Standing Committee on the Historical Foundation of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches, recommends, "That all sessions of Presbyteries, Synods, Presbyterials, and Synodicals be urged to deposit their early and current records with the Historical Foundation."

3. On page 47, the Report of the Standing Committee on Assembly's Training School for Lay Workers, recommends, "That the Assembly urge all Synods, Presbyteries, Churches, Sunday Schools and Societies to give the full quota asked by the Assembly for the General Assembly's Training School."

4. On page 51, the Report of the Standing Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief, recommends the following—"That the General Assembly urge the Presbyteries to use greater care than ever before in receiving into the ministry of our church men who soon must come on the roll of Ministerial Relief, after rendering but meager service to our Church. Also to a more prayerful and extensive consideration of the antecedents, the personality, the ability, the training and fitness for the ministry of the men who appear before the Presbyteries with the request that they be received as candidates for the ministry. The large number of such men who are dropped year by year from the roll of candidates indicates that much greater care and thought are needed in the exercise of this important function of the Presbytery."

"That the report of the Presbyterian Ministers' Fund of the old relief fund, as of December 31, 1929, be filed in the office of the Executive Committee."

5. On page 61, the Report of Standing Committee on Home Missions, recommends—"To give impetus to this movement, (a more aggressive campaign of evangelism), the Assembly urges Synods and Presbyteries to provide inspirational evangelistic programs at their fall meetings, that in the local churches organize and instruct personal workers' bands to the end that each Christian shall be brought to face his or her responsibility in seeking and saving the lost."

"That the Assembly, Synods and Presbyteries be urged to study carefully the changing population centres within our area and give diligence to the founding and fostering of new churches where there is present need or an indication of future growth."

6. On page 63, the Report of the Standing Committee on Assembly's Work calls our attention as following—

"We would, however, earnestly call your attention to the cold, naked fact that the budget recommended by the Assembly itself represents

the minimum with which its work can be carried on efficiently, and that Synods and Presbyteries have been cutting the heart out of this budget before sending it down to the churches.”

7. On page 76, the Report of the Standing Committee on Foreign Missions recommends—“That Foreign Mission Chairmen of Synods and Presbyteries arrange with the Foreign Mission office for missionary itineraries among all the Churches within their bounds as often as opportunity affords.”

8. On page 79, the Report of the Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries recommends the following as suggested from Columbia Seminary—

“That the Presbyteries be urged to exercise great care and to accept as candidates for the ministry only men who are of sound health and good character and thoroughly prepared, and that they exercise careful oversight of their candidates while training.”

This completes our report, and we submit it to your approval or correction.

The meeting was presided over by the Secretary of Stewardship, Rev. J. R. McGregor. It was announced that our Presbytery had been assigned \$75,000.00 for Benevolences for the coming year by Synod's Stewardship Committee. Upon motion, which was carried, Presbytery accepted a Benevolent Budget of \$60,000.00.

The motion that the apportionment to the individual churches be the same as last year, was carried. There followed an open conference on plans for the Every Member Canvass.

At 12:20 there was a recess for lunch.

Dr. D. Clay Lilly spoke on "Conditions in our Church." Dr. Neal Anderson, of Savannah Presbytery, was invited to sit with us as a visiting brother.

Presbytery discussed ways of promoting the Every Member Canvass. Plans were made for group conferences in some of the fields and for Stewardship services on Sundays in some of the individual churches.

A communication from the Executive Committee of Foreign Missions with reference to the Congress on World Missions was read by Rev. J. R. McGregor.

The following were excused for non-attendance at this

meeting: Revs. C. W. Robinson, T. F. Haney, W. T. Baker, and J. J. Douglass.

Rev. J. D. Smith invited the Presbytery to hold its regular Spring meeting in the Dan River Church. This was accepted.

A motion was carried to the effect that Rev. J. D. Smith and the Moderator be asked to prepare a program for the next meeting and mail a copy of it to each member of the Presbytery.

Dr. J. S. Foster brought the closing message on "The Power Adequate To the Task."

Resolution of thanks to the ladies of the local church for the splendid dinner and fellowship was made by Rev. J. W. Foster. Presbytery adopted this resolution by a rising vote.

The following motion was carried—That the annual meeting of the Presbytery considering Stewardship be held at Yadkinville, and that the Presbytery's Treasurer pay the ladies for the dinner.

Presbytery heard Mr. E. B. Eldridge from Glade Valley on the Glade Valley School.

The Minutes were read and adopted.

Presbytery was closed with prayer and the benediction.

Minutes of Spring Meeting

Dan River Presbyterian Church, April 14, 1931.

The Presbytery of Winston-Salem met in its sixteenth stated meeting at 11:00 A. M. The opening sermon was preached by the retiring moderator, Rev. R. H. Stone, from the text Rev. 2:2—"I know thy works."

Following this the Presbytery was constituted with prayer. The roll was then called and the following were present:

Rev. J. W. Foster, of Cooleemee, was elected moderator by acclamation. R. H. Stone was elected temporary clerk.

The host-pastor, Rev. J. D. Smith, gave the welcome of the Church. The outline of hours of meeting were as follows: Adjourn at 12:30 P. M. Re-convene at 2:00 P. M., adjourn at 5:00 P. M. Dr. W. L. Lingle to preach the pre-communion sermon at 7:30 P. M. This to be followed by the report of the Foreign Mission Committee and an address.

Dr. W. L. Lingle was invited to sit with us as a visiting brother.

Rev. J. P. Taylor, Jr., was elected reading clerk. An order of the day for the first thing after lunch was to attend to the application of M. W. Norfleet, Jr., of the First Church Winston-Salem, to be received as a candidate for the ministry.

The minutes of former called meetings were read and a committee consisting of Dr. J. S. Foster, Revs. E. P. Bradley and R. H. Stone was appointed to correct the minutes and make them consistent with the proceedings. Rev. C. W. Robinson led in prayer before adjournment.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Promptly at 2:00 P. M. Presbytery re-convened and prayer was offered by Rev. J. K. Fleming. The following Committees were appointed:

Rev. T. F. Haney was enrolled and excused for not attending the morning session. Rev. H. J. Womeldorf was enrolled and gave excuse for absence at the morning session. Also he gave an excuse for Rev. J. J. Douglass' absence.

Presbytery then proceeded to take under its care M. W. Norfleet, Jr., a Senior at Davidson College, as a candidate for the ministry. His pastor, Dr. J. S. Foster, was requested to examine him in regard to his motives for seeking the Gospel ministry and his experimental religion. A letter from the Session of the First Church Winston-Salem commending Mr. Norfleet was read.

A number of personal testimonies were given as to his sterling christian character. Upon motion he was received under our care as a candidate for the ministry. Presbytery stood and was led in prayer by Dr. D. Clay Lilly, a former pastor, asking for God's blessing upon him in his further preparation for the Gospel ministry.

A communication from Dr. E. E. Gillespie was read relative to a Committee on Vacancy and Supply.

Rev. J. R. McGregor was elected to the Synodical Committee on Vacancy and Supply.

Rev. H. J. Womeldorf made a report on the work of the Glade Valley School. A part of his time was used in having a student—John Cashion—speak of the meaning of Glade Valley to the students through its religious and other student activities.

Then came the period given to Home Missions in which we faced the tragic situation. This was conducted by Dr. J.

S. Foster, a member of the Sub-Committee on Home Missions of the Assembly's Work Committee. Before going to prayer about the matter, Presbytery heard a report of the Presbytery's Home Mission Committee made by the chairman, Rev. J. R. McGregor.

REPORT OF HOME MISSION COMMITTEE
of Winston-Salem Presbytery

Your Committee has responded to every call of its chairman for meetings, and has given sufficient time for proper consideration and promotion of the work you have assigned it. Our meetings have never been hurried in their deliberations. Your chairman would like to commend all members of the committee and especially our treasurer, Mr. J. H. Thompson, for their interest and co-operation in this work.

We are glad to report that all of our fields have been served regularly by ministers since last May. There was evident effort to work out the recommendations of your committee adopted in the meeting of Presbytery at Mount Airy last spring. Yet we regret that every Church did not have a Daily Vacation Bible School and also a revival campaign. We have had reported only 17 Bible Schools and 18 evangelistic campaigns. The enrollment of the Bible Schools was large, which we feel means that real progress is being made in building the Kingdom of our Lord and strengthening our Church. For this work we had assisting our ministers and regular workers two students of the Assembly Training School and a number of volunteer helpers. Many of these Volunteer helpers are especially capable and well trained for this particular work. The leaders of our work in Ashe County are especially favored in the very fine group they secure from near and far to conduct their Christian Chautauquas. We believe that more and more we must now depend upon this volunteer leadership.

In our evangelistic campaigns our own ministers were greatly blessed and were assisted by others of our strong preachers. We have reports of only 18 special evangelistic services. We regret that the other Churches failed in this matter. It is insistently urged that each Church have such special services. There were added to our Churches during the year 77 on confession and 43 added on Certificate.

Mr. J. W. Foster was called to the Coolemeéc Church and began his work there May 15, 1930. There has been very marked progress under his leadership. Sunday School rooms have been added to the Church and a most attractive manse built. The Bible School conducted last summer has our largest enrollment.

The Church at Thomasville has grown to a membership of more than a hundred. The pastor, Rev. J. K. Fleming, has also led them in furnishing Sunday School equipment and the erection of a beautiful manse at a cost of approximately \$4,500.00.

Your Committee is especially grateful to those organizations and agencies of our Church which make possible our work, namely, the General Assembly's Executive Committee of Home Missions, The Synod's Home Mission Committee, our own Winston-Salem Presbyterian, The First Church of Greensboro, and the Executive Committee of Religious Education for our General Assembly. Without the generous aid of all these we could not promote our Mission work so effectively.

YOUR COMMITTEE WOULD RECOMMEND

1. That every Church receiving support for its minister from any of our Home Mission funds should have an Every Member Canvass and through the year make some contribution to these Home Mission Committees.

2. That every Church plan to have a Daily Vacation Bible School and an evangelistic campaign during the year.

3. That our Presbytery urge its ministers, elders, deacons, and laymen to strive more to promote congregational missions in conducting Sunday Schools and services in places where there is an opportunity to build the Kingdom of Christ.

4. That the ministers and others receiving part support from the Home Mission funds be instructed by Presbytery to submit a monthly report of their work on blanks prepared by the Presbytery's Home Mission Committee.

5. That our Presbytery ask the Synod's Home Mission Committee for an appropriation of \$6,544.00.

We attach to this report the report of our treasurer and our budget for March 31, 1931 to April 1, 1932.

Your Committee on Men's work respectfully reports to Presbytery for the year ending March 31, 1931:

FIRST: That the program planned for the year and approved by Presbytery at the Spring Session 1930 was abandoned by the Committee because it felt that there was not enough interest in our demand for the Men's Organization as outlined by the Assembly's Committee on Men's Work and the said committee refused to sanction the promotion of any other form of organization on the grounds that their plan was the only one that the General Assembly had approved.

SECOND: That efforts were made during the year to become better familiar with the plan approved by the General Assembly and determine whether or not the said plan can be used with a reasonable hope of its success in both the large and small churches. After careful consideration the undersigned chairman has reached the conclusion that the plan is not only usable but is the best plan that has yet been advanced for Men's work in the larger churches, and that the plan with certain small modifications is workable and can succeed with average leadership in the smaller churches or groups of churches.

THIRD: Your committee chairman met with the Synod's Committee on Men's work and helped to outline the State-wide Conference held in Greensboro in January and helped to advertise and encourage a large attendance from this Presbytery to the end that the men of the various churches might become more interested in the Master's work and in the kind of organization being promoted by the Assembly's Committee.

FOURTH: That from this meeting came the inspiration to one church at least to organize under the Assembly plan and this organization promises to do large things in its efforts to interest its men and put them to work for the Master. It is sincerely hoped that there will be other churches to soon fall in line and urges the pastors to try and interest their men to this end.

FIFTH: Your committee realizes the futility of trying to put a Men's organization into any church where the pastor is not wholly in sympathy with the need of the work, the plan of the work and possibility of success of the work. We therefore urge each Minister to study the plan, its possibilities and both past and present experiences. This committee does not desire to thrust its activities upon any church and will not but is ready and willing to lend any assistance that it can to the end that we may have in Winson-Salem Presbytery the men of every church organized and presenting a united front to spread the cause we espouse and to bring Christ's Kingdom here on earth.

Lee on the Executive Committee of Sabbath and Family Religion; that Miss Delphine Brown and Mr. M. W. Norfleet be added to the Committee on Woman's Work, Young People's Societies and Sabbath School; and that Rev. C. E. Clarke fill the place of Rev. Geo. W. Lee as a Trustee of Glade Valley School.

After a prayer by Mr. M. W. Norfleet, Presbytery took recess until 7:30 P. M.

EVENING SESSION

At 7:45 P. M. Presbytery reconvened and was opened with prayer by Dr. J. S. Foster. Continuing the devotional service another prayer was offered by Rev. C. W. Robinson. This being the time for the Presbyterial sacrament of the Lord's Supper, Dr. Foster presented Dr. W. L. Lingle, who

preached the pre-Communion sermon from the text Ex. 12:26 —“What mean ye by this service?” His subject was “The Meaning of Communion.”

Assisting at the table were Revs. J. W. Luke and J. K. Fleming and the elements were distributed by Elders J. R. Forrest, E. Pyrtle, C. A. Baird and J. R. Finley.

The report of the Foreign Mission Committee of the Presbytery was made by the Chairman, Rev. C. W. Robinson. Pending the adoption of this report an address was made by Rev. W. G. Neville, of our North Brazil Mission.

Presbytery was adjourned with prayer until 9:00 A. M.

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

Presbytery reconvened at 9:00 A. M. and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. R. McGregor. Prayers were led by Elder G. A. Sides and Rev. C. E. Clarke.

Thereupon followed a consideration of the recommendations of the report of the Committee on Foreign Missions. Upon motion the report and recommendations were adopted.

REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSIONS

Your Committee, in this survey of the year's work abroad, finds much to encourage the Church in the prosecution of this great enterprise.

The Mission force in the African Field reports 1649 conversions, notwithstanding the demoralization of the natives and the disintegration of village life, caused by the inrush of Western commercialism. The Master's missionary promise, “Lo, I am with you!” was fulfilled to our young people who have been exposed to the evils emanating from these commercial centers of vice and greed and worldliness, and they have kept the faith. The year was a wonderful development of sacrificial giving. The total was \$5,432.00, which is a twenty five per cent increase over last year. One significant fact, many have given up profitable work and high salaries to begin their studies for the Gospel ministry. A recent letter says, “The Morrison Bible School has more applicants than we can teach.”

The Brazil Mission reports a year of great progress. Enlarged

enrollment in all our schools—Agnes Erskine College report 133, The Varginha 120, The Campo Bello 119 pupils. The Garanhuns School, the first year in its splendid \$50,000.00 plant, enrolled 261. The Lavras Schools 548. These young people educated in our schools furnish a basic hope not only for church membership, but under the blessings of God, many recruits for the ministry. The year was notable for its evangelistic advance. At one station church attendance was almost doubled, and contributions more than doubled. Another is about ready to be turned over to the National Church as self-supporting. Soul winning campaigns have been greatly blessed of God—one resulting in 130 conversions, another in 300. Rev. Dr. George W. Truett just returning from a trip to Brazil, says, "I found the greatest evangelistic opportunity I have ever known." Our men are pleading for more help.

In China antagonism to Christianity has largely died down, though the laws regarding religious teaching in the schools continue an embarrassing factor. It has been thought best to close some of our station schools. Others are running as usual with capacity attendance and often the necessity of turning away eager applicants for lack of room. In the three schools, but two of them union schools, which have been registered, or applied for registration, nearly half of the students have elected Bible courses, while constant and powerful Christian influences are brought to bear on the whole student body. Conspicuous in the year's reports stands out the fact of opportunity. The old granite conservatism is gone.

Under shocks of modern science, industry and invention, of wars, bandits, communism, and famine, the masses of the common people have had their confidence in themselves, in their leaders, in their old beliefs and customs, sorely shaken, and are showing an unprecedented openness to the Gospel. Highly significant is the recent public confession of Christ by President Kai Shok. The Church of Christ in China is vigorously pressing its Five Year Evangelistic Campaign. Our missionaries also keenly realize that now is the time, the critical time, for a great advance movement. Our missions are calling with urgency for at least 36 additional missionaries.

JAPAN

In Japan there is going on all over the nation the work of the Kingdom of God Movement, built under God around the personality of Toyohiko Kagawa.

His fellow countrymen flock to hear him in great numbers. Kagawa is the product of our own mission work, which has always laid the supreme emphasis on evangelism. The Japanese Presbytery within whose bounds our work is located and which yearly reaps its fruit,

added 1000 last year, making its whole enrollment 13,000. A fine year's work is reported by our Theological Seminary, the Carrie McMillan Home and our various kindergartens. The Golden Castle College had an enrollment of 724. Our mission is sorely undermanned. It is calling for help.

KOREA

The Korea Mission, despite a reduced force and budget and an increasingly difficult situation, reports the past year the most fruitful it has ever known. Conversions numbered 1337. The ten station schools and the many country schools, all thoroughly Christian in faculty and atmosphere—indeed it is looked upon as a failure to graduate a non-Christian student from the High School—report a year of growth and rich spiritual blessing. The Woman's Auxiliaries have grown remarkably, and the women showing capacity for leadership. All Bible classes and Institutes, for both men and women, have grown in favor with over 500 out to one class.

Thus thousands of better trained Bible students are enriching the church life.

Yet there remain miles and miles of virgin territory untouched by the Gospel. And the pleas from this field are for more men and money to supply its needs.

MEXICO

“Never have the opportunities been so many or the outlook brighter.” So begins the Mexico Mission's report. The Woman's work is taking definite shape. Our Mission schools, enrolling 361, are all evangelistic centers, with many conversions, they work in the neighboring villages during vacation, so that many hear the Gospel from them for the first time. Our girls schools at Zitacuaro and Chilpancingo are rejoicing in their new Birthday Gift buildings, and the Graybill Memorial in its new Kelly Auditorium. Though our seven evangelistic missionaries have dwindled to one, he reports an encouraging year's work. The National Presbyterian Church with its four Presbyteries, is endeavouring to meet its responsibilities. It now has its own Theological Seminary, of which our own Dr. W. A. Ross is Vice President. But more than half our territory is yet virgin soil.

THE WHOLE FIELD

In our hospitals, dispensaries and on medical circuits, there were treated last year over 320,000 patients, with the Gospel message given to each.

The total conversions were nearly 5000 not including work turned over to National Churches, while nearly 90,000 were trained in our 1950 Sunday Schools.

Receipts on the field, including native contributions, educational and medical fees, totaled over \$420,000.00 showing that every Foreign Mission dollar given by our Church meant \$1.35 spent on support and promotion of our Foreign Mission enterprise, a tremendously fruitful way of investing our means for the advancement of the Kingdom.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That Churches, Societies and individuals assume, whatever practicable, definite responsibility for definite parts of the Foreign Mission work.

2. That ministers and other Church leaders call on the Foreign Mission office to aid them, through its literature or through visits of missionaries, or of Foreign Mission secretaries, in impressing the needs of this great cause upon their people.

3. That a Church School of Missions be held in **every church** during January, 1932, in an effort to bring to every man, woman and child the reports and findings of the Chattanooga Missionary Congress as set forth in the book "The Church Faces Foreign Missions."

4. That all our Sunday Schools be asked to carry this year as their specific Foreign Mission responsibility some part of the \$100,000.00 being raised for our work in Brazil.

5. That our Young People's Societies be asked to shoulder this year as their special responsibility the \$6,000.00 necessary to operate the Jennie Speer Girl's School, Kwangju, Korea.

6. That every church be asked to observe January 24-31, 1932 as the week of prayer and self-denial for Foreign Missions.

This Survey reveals the fact that God has graciously blessed the work. It is no time for retrenchment. It is the day for telescopic vision—a wide horizon—The Master's imperative command is: "Lift up thine eyes and see." The harvest is white to the sickle. Worlds of spiritual wealth await thy conquest. Opportunities invite. "Indifference is disloyalty. Apathy is sin." There is special obligation upon us. Let us meet it.

Just last night I received word from our Executive Secretary saying, "The receipts for the year fell short \$152,260.00 of paying the cost of the year's work. This \$152,260.00 increased the debt to \$359,277.00 on April 1, 1931. There is no alternative except to make a 33-1-3 per cent cut in apportionments.

The Secretaries and Treasurer have voluntarily reduced their salaries by 10 per cent—all office force receiving \$100.00 or more by 10 per cent—under \$100.00 by five per cent.

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS

Thirty schools report 2910 pupils, with 155 added to the Church on profession. They report 4 Teacher Training Classes, 3 missionary Committees, 16 have organized classes, 7 have Worker's Conferences. 18 had Daily Vacation Bible Schools with an enrollment of 1763. Six report Cradle Roll Departments. Our own literature is used and the pupils memorize Bible, Catechisms and hymns.

The Thirty schools gave \$815.00 to Foreign Missions, \$72.00 to Assembly's Home Missions, \$868 to Christian Education and Ministerial Relief, \$469 to Religious Education and Publication, \$51 to Synod's Home Missions, \$1,936 to Orphan's Home, \$645 to Educational Institutions and \$221 to Presbytery's Home Missions. Total Benevolences \$4,612. Current Expenses \$3,541. Miscellaneous amount \$351. Grand total \$8,930.

Recommendations

1. That more attention be given by the officers and teachers of the Sunday School to leading the pupils to a definite decision for Christ.
2. That more attention be given to the Cradle Roll and Home Departments.
3. That every Church try to have a Teacher Training Class; Worker's Council and Daily Vacation Bible School.

Rev. J. P. Taylor, Jr., reported for the Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief. This was adopted and is as follows:

Your Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief would submit the following report to Presbytery:

THE WORK AT LARGE

Presbyteries in March, 1931, reported 515 candidates for the ministry under their care—a decrease of 19 from the previous year.

237 candidates for the ministry and medical mission fields and 23 young women preparing for special religious work were aided to the amount of \$27,784.00 (\$10,046.00 less than last year). 276 students (144 women and 132 men) were loaned \$39,455.00 in order that they might secure a college education. 68 worthy applicants were denied loans due to the fact that no funds were available.

510 homes received ministerial relief to the amount of \$184,320.75, a decrease of \$13,848.00 altho there were 16 additional homes.

RECEIPTS FOR PAST YEAR

From living donors \$170,071.32.

From interest, rent, refund \$94,406.39.

Total receipts of \$264,477.71; a decrease of \$39,575.00.

This decrease together with the debt of last year leaves a bank debt of \$78,398.27 facing our Executive Committee of Christian Education and Ministerial Relief.

May we, as pastors of churches in this Presbytery, be faithful in presenting this cause to our respective Churches in order that the glorious work of this committee may not be curtailed. May we be much in prayer for God's blessing upon our Executive Committee in the work it is doing.

THE WORK LOCALLY

We have two young men under the care of Presbytery who are candidates for the ministry: Mr. O. W. Marshal who is at Union Seminary (1st year) and Mr. F. A. Watson who is at Davidson College.

We have one beneficiary of C. E. & M. R., Lucy Morrow, the wife of our late colored brother.

THE MINISTER'S ANNUITY FUND

In the face of the unusual difficulties of 1930, the sum of \$818,142 in cash and pledges was received at the Louisville office from 17,340 Presbyterians. 767 Churches have already put on a canvass for funds. The remaining 440,515 Presbyterians and the other 2,197 Churches will meet their responsibility, and if the Minister's Annuity Fund is backed by the pastor, the Fund will be put into operation April 1, 1932.

The following Churches in our Presbytery have forwarded cash or pledges to the Louisville office:

Collinstown, Flat Rock, Mount Airy 1st, Reynolda, Wilkesboro, Waughtown.

Your committee would earnestly urge the other Churches to have the campaign as soon as feasible that our Presbytery may raise the amount we agreed to subscribe of the \$3,000,000.00.

WOMAN'S WORK

The Presbyterial of Winston-Salem Presbytery has submitted to your Committee their annual report from which the following is taken:

There are 22 Auxiliaries in the Presbyterial with 1,177 members. They conducted 12 study classes, 6 reading circles and 3 Church Schools of Missions, all of which pertained to Foreign Missions. Seventeen Auxiliaries observed the week of self-denial and prayer for Foreign Missions. There were 13 Home Mission study classes, 6 reading circles and one Church School of Missions, with 15 Auxiliaries observing the week of self-denial and prayer for Home Missions. Eighteen canvasses were made for the Presbyterian Survey and there were 307 subscribers. There were 16 canvasses made for Church papers and 246 subscribers.

The total denominational benevolences were \$14,278.82; total for local Church work was \$1,752.08. Miscellaneous contributions amounted to \$537.61. There is a Grand Total of \$16,568.51 or more than \$14.00 per capita.

Presbytery would render hearty thanks to our good women who have labored with us in the Gospel. Their influence has been felt in every Church within our bounds and throughout the remainder of our work at home and unto the uttermost part of the earth.

We hereby request Dr. John S. Foster to express to the Presbyterial at their coming meeting in Winston-Salem First Church our abiding appreciation and growing esteem in which they are held by our body.

Their total gifts to denominational benevolences amount to \$269.00; to local Church work \$76.00; and to Miscellaneous \$28.00. Their total gifts were \$373.00.

STANDING COMMITTEE'S REPORT ON MEN'S WORK

There were ten churches out of the thirty-five of our Presbytery that report active Men's work. Two of these had their organization of the men in single churches, but seven were from Ashe County in Home Mission Churches. The unique organization of the seven churches of Ashe County was praised by Dr. Purcell and recommended as a splendid way of uniting the men of several small churches into one large group.

The Winston-Salem First Church stated that they had begun the Men's Work in full accord with the Assembly's plan.

Dakotah Church has an organization, which is more a Bible

Class, with a membership of 49. They do not follow the Assembly's plan.

The Lexington Church also has an organization of 79 members which does not use the Assembly's plan.

The seven churches of Ashe County have a membership of about forty and are organized under the Assembly plan.

This is a great contrast between the Woman's Work and the Men's Work.

We recommend, therefore, that the men get busy:

1. That each church organize on Assembly's plan.
2. That each church send representatives to Montreat's Conferences for Men.
3. That the men carry out some evangelistic work in each church.

There are 102 family altars. There are reported 159 tithers. Fourteen churches report as having made the Every Member Canvass. Several report that the Every Member Canvass was partially made and some did not report.

The reports indicate that Sabbath desecration and worldly conformity prevail to some extent within our bounds, but on the whole, we believe the spiritual end is sought by our people.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Your committee has nothing new of special interest to report on this enterprise of the Church, as we have not heard anything from the Central Committee.

The news we get in "The Survey" is mostly local and personal and all have access to that periodical.

AFRICA

The rapid growth of our Mission work in the Dark Continent is the marvel of the day. Notwithstanding the handicap of contact with Western Commercialism, Church membership is increasing in the African field faster than in any other. The young people seem to be thirsting for a knowledge of the truth. That peoples have been the subjects of exploitation, for many generations by the stronger and more enlightened nations of the world, and now, it seems, that GOD, in His Providence is lifting the burden and giving them release from oppression. Self-government and self-support of the native church seem no longer a distant dream but a present reality. The responsibility for his task has been born in the native Christian, and now still greater progress is confidently expected.

BRAZIL

Notwithstanding the upheaval of the government and the financial

stringency of the time, our mission forces report gratifying success in all their work. Some of them say "This has been my best year in Brazil."

CHINA

From all of our mission stations, our Missionaries tell us the people are ready to hear the gospel. The evangelistic work has been prosecuted with great intensity. We have reason to believe that GOD'S blessing is attending all these services. The educational institutions manned, both by foreign and native teachers, are gaining the confidence of the people and are crowded with students. Medical Missions in China are accomplishing a two-fold work, the healing of the body and the healing of the soul. God's blessing seems to be resting on the entire force, both foreign and native.

JAPAN

The "Kingdom of God Movement" built under God around the personality of Toyohiko-Kagawa is gaining great strength, uniting the Christian forces, so that our missionaries expect, as a result of his work, a great mass movement that shall shake the very foundations of the nation. KAGAWA is the product of our own mission work, which has always put the supreme emphasis on Evangelism. The Japanese Presbytery within whose bounds our work is located, and which yearly reaps its fruit, added 1,000 last year, making its total enrollment, 13,000.

Our mission is sorely undermanned. It is calling for more Missionaries.

KOREA

Our workers declare the past year one of the most fruitful we have known. Despite a smaller force, a decreased budget, and an increasingly difficult situation, the fact remains that God did great things in this land last year, in every department of our work.

We carry on our work from five stations, but our missionaries are responsible for only the country work. The City work is carried on and financed entirely by the native church. Each foreign missionary has the oversight of 185,000 in his special field and directs the movement of more than 25 Churches and meeting points. The educational institutions are manned by Christian teachers and leaders and they steadfastly maintain they will conduct only Christian schools, the Bible is an integral part of the curriculum. Our five hospitals served thousands afflicted with almost every disease that man is heir to. These hospitals are used as an opportunity of preaching Christ to the in patients, and hundreds of these patients accepted Christ, which is the cause of great thanksgiving.

MEXICO

Never have the opportunities been so many, or the outlook brighter for the spread of the gospel.

An important feature of the evangelistic work has been the institute held in different places, bringing the workers together, for prayer and conference, enabling them to know each other better, giving practice in self government and training in the different phases of self support. The Educational work has been very satisfactory. The students are trained in industrial work, in athletics, and in those nature studies, that not only add to their knowledge, but refine and elevate the students. The Medical work is a strong asset in our Mexican mission, many people, who have received service in our hospitals, publicly profess Christ and when they go to their distant homes, carry a New Testament, with a promise to read it every day. In this private way the Gospel of Christ is reaching many of the unsaved.

Recommendations:

1. That this Presbytery offer a prayer of thanks to GOD for His blessing upon our Foreign work for the past year and implore His guidance and help for the prosecution of the work.
2. That Churches, societies and individuals—assume, wherever practical, definite responsibility for a definite part of the Foreign work.
3. That a Church School of Missions be held in every church during January, 1932, in an effort to bring to every man, woman and child in the church, knowledge of the needs of our foreign work and enforce upon them a conscious responsibility of their duty in supplying these needs.
4. That our Sunday Schools be asked to shoulder some part of the \$100,000 being raised for our work in Brazil.
5. That our Young People's Societies be asked to raise the \$6,000 necessary to operate the Jennie Speer Girls' School, Kwangju, Korea.
6. That every church in the Presbytery be asked to observe the week of prayer and self-denial January 24th-31st. 1932.

Dr. J. S. Foster was heard in regard to the Home Mission program of the Assembly.

Dr. E. E. Gillespie, of Orange Presbytery, was invited to sit as a visiting brother.

A Memorial of the late Rev. E. P. Bradley was read by Dr. Foster. It was adopted and follows:

EDWARD PASCHAL BRADLEY

When Edward Paschal Bradley's earthly ministry was terminated by the call of our Heavenly Father to his eternal reward, every member of the Presbytery of Winston-Salem suffered the loss of a noble, honored fellow laborer and the cause of Christ a devoted servant.

Born in Kingtree, S. C., November 11, 1869, he passed away on May 28, in Salisbury, N. C., at the age of 61. Shortly after his birth his family moved to Iredell County and his active life was spent within the bounds of his adopted State. As a boy he attended a well known preparatory school in Statesville, and then entered Davidson College, graduating in the class of 1895. His theological training was received at Union Seminary. His first pastorate was at Townsville, N. C., where he labored for a number of years. Twenty-three years ago he accepted the call to the church at Mocksville where his integrity and faithfulness to duty that ever characterized him made him a minister and citizen who was held in high esteem wherever he was known.

We, his fellow-Presbyters who shared with him the problems, the responsibilities and the joys incident to the trust our Master hath reposed in us, would bear testimony to the strength of his character, the fidelity of his stewardship, the sympathy of his heart and the spiritually sacrificial nature of his soul.

He was truly humble. Interpreting humility to mean neither self-effacement nor self-abasement but rather the recognition of the goodness and the power of God in whatever talent or opportunities he possessed, he unreservedly leaned on God, sought His grace, and wholly and wholesomely dedicated his life to the revelation of the redeeming ministry of His Lord.

He was among us as one who served. When Winston-Salem Presbytery was erected by the Synod he was elected its first Stated Clerk and served in this capacity till his death. He was faithful in the discharge of his duties, regular in his attendance upon the meetings of the Presbytery, zealous for the promotion of its welfare and ever watchful of its interests.

He was truly a minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. He was not tainted with isms. He believed Christ to be the Prophet, Priest and King Whose life and work for the glory of God and the redemption of man were all sufficient and all satisfying for every moral and spiritual need. His ministry was a ministry of the Cross, pointing unregenerate men to the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world, and admonishing regenerated men to abide in the Christ as the source of all power, wisdom, comfort and inspiration.

We have lost a friend, the memory of whose presence with its genial heart, its unquestioned loyalty, its unaffected simplicity and fellowship and its wise judgment will abide with us as a precious legacy.

TO THE PRESBYTERY OF WINSTON-SALEM

As one of your Commissioners to the General Assembly, I beg the privilege of reporting that I was present at the opening session and remained throughout all its deliberations. I sought to discharge the duties assigned me, serving on the Committee on Bills and Overtures and as Chairman of the Judicial Commission to hear the complaint of the Presbytery of Arkansas against the Synod of Arkansas.

Upon motion Dr. Foster was commended for his diligence.

Presbytery returned to the hearing of the unread communications.

First, a letter from the Director of Country Church Work, Dr. Henry W. McLaughlin, was read. Upon motion the Moderator was authorized to appoint a Committee on Country Church Work.

Rev. J. R. Offield was enrolled and excused for his absence at the morning session.

Resuming the hearing of Communications a letter from Dr. Thos. W. Currie, Chairman of the Assembly's Committee on Stewardship and Finance, was read and referred to the Stewardship Committee.

A letter from Dr. John L. Fairly, Co-ordinate Secretary of Religious Education and Publication, was referred to Presbytery's Home Mission Committee.

Rev. J. K. Fleming made the report of the Stewardship Committee. The report was amended and adopted and is as follows:

The Stewardship Committee in submitting its report would call attention to last year's Benevolent contributions—that there was contributed by the Church at large the sum of \$2,007,354 to the Assembly's causes, that the sum of \$286,927 was contributed to our Synodical Causes, and the sum of \$7,080.00 to Presbyterian Home Missions. Last year's Benevolent gifts showed a decline in the Assembly's Causes of \$189,945, in Synod's Causes of \$16,320, and of Presbytery's Home Missions; this falling off being due to the Financial Depression which has made itself felt very keenly in the work of the Church.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the date of the EVERY MEMBER CANVASS be March 13, 1932.

2. That the theme of the Every Member Canvass be "EVERY MEMBER ENLISTED."

3. That the six weeks February 1 to March 15 be used as a period of intensive Stewardship study, inspiration, education, and cultivation.

4. That all Churches and Church people be urged to pray for the purpose and success of the Every Member Canvass, especially during the week prior to the Canvass.

5. That all Churches and Church leaders make special effort to enlist proportionate givers, beginning with one tenth as a great Christian principle, and that the ministers, elders, and deacons take the lead in this.

6. That our Presbyterian Secretary of Stewardship arrange for a special meeting of Presbytery for prayer, inspiration, and instruction, preparatory to the Every Member Canvass.

7. That all Churches be urged to accept the Benevolent askings apportioned them, and earnestly endeavor to raise their quotas in full.

8. That the Churches be asked to follow the percentages adopted by Presbytery.

9. That with the budget as the minimum, that we continue to stress plans for supplemental offerings, so far as ordered by the Assembly, Synod, and Presbytery.

10. That the plan of percentages for Benevolent Causes be as follows—

Foreign Missions	31.8 per cent
Assembly's Home Missions	16.8 per cent
Christian Education & Min. Relief	7.8 per cent
Religious Education	2.1 per cent
Assembly's Training School9 per cent
Bible Cause6 per cent
Synod's Home Missions	10.0 per cent
Orphans' Home	7.5 per cent
Schools and Colleges	8.7 per cent
Union Theol. Seminary	1.3 per cent
Presbytery's Home Missions	12.5 per cent

11. That a budget of \$50,000.00 be adopted by the Presbytery for Benevolences, and that this amount be apportioned to the Churches on the same Pro-Rata basis as last year.

12. That those churches which did not make an Every Member Canvass last spring be urged to make the Canvass this fall.

Presbytery adjourned with prayer by Rev. T. F. Haney to reconvene at 7:30 P. M.

EVENING SESSION

Presbytery reconvened at 7:30 P. M. and was opened with the singing of a hymn and the Lord's Prayer. Rev. J. R. McGregor presided.

Rev. J. P. Taylor was enrolled and excused for tardiness.

Dr. E. E. Gillespie gave a very interesting and inspiring address on Home Missions. This was followed by a number

of pictures, projected on the screen, showing the work done in some of the Home Mission fields during the year.

Mr. E. B. Eldridge and several students brought greetings from Glade Valley School.

Rev. J. R. McGregor made the report of Presbytery's Home Mission Committee. This was adopted and follows:

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE

Since the spring meeting of our Presbytery we have had the Danbury Group, the Glade Valley Group, and the Elkin Group to become vacant. Your Committee is hopeful of having these fields supplied with acceptable ministers at an early date. We have had ministers to visit the field and are endeavoring to secure the finest men available.

The summer has been a most encouraging one. Our ministers have been most zealous in working towards the goals adopted by the Presbytery last spring. We have not yet had a Bible School and revival campaign in every Church, but we believe that every Church can have the special campaign before the end of this year. During the summer there have been conducted 23 Daily Vacation Bible Schools with an enrollment of 2,457. We had Miss Olivia Adams and Miss Margaret Cox with sixteen special voluntary helpers in Ashe County. Miss Virginia Hart was also able to secure most efficient volunteer helpers for the Bible Schools of Stokes and Surry Counties. We believe this has been our very best year for Bible Schools. With these we have also had conducted 21 special evangelistic campaigns. There have been 190 additions to our Churches by profession of faith in Jesus Christ, and 14 have come into our Church by certificate.

We regret to report that Miss Myrtle Williamson resigned the position of Young People's Worker for Ashe County. We have not been able to find one for this position but hope to have the proper young woman soon.

Our Treasurer informs us that we have borrowed at present four-hundred and seventy-five dollars. This fact makes it imperative that we urge every Church to send their contributions for this part of our work. Each minister should insist that his Churches pay their apportionment for this cause. The distressing condition of the treasury of our General Assembly Home Missions may mean that we can not receive the full amount we had expected from this Committee. We will also recall that our own Synod had to reduce its aid to us. We are making every effort to end this year without a deficit. To do this we must have the loyal support of each of our Churches, how-

ever small they may be. If each one of us will strive to do our part in this matter we are confident that our work can go forward in a most heartening way.

Dr. Gillespie led in a prayer for the Home Mission cause.

A rising vote of thanks was extended to the following: the people from Loggins School House who sang for Presbytery, the representatives from the Glade Valley School, and to Dr. Gillespie for his address.

The Moderator coming to the chair, a request was presented asking for the organization of a Church at Nella. The following names were on the petition: Ruby Dolinger, Effie Dolinger, Mary Hartzog, Elzina Barker, N. W. Graham, Ruth Perry, Ruth Ham, F. D. Blevins, Mrs. Hattie Hartzog, A. L. Carter, Mrs. Rosa Sullivan, W. M. Little, Mrs. H. G. Wiles, Mrs. A. L. Carter, Mrs. Alice Dolinger, L. B. Ham and Mrs. L. B. Ham.

The request for organization was granted and the following Commission was appointed: Rev. J. R. McGregor, Chairman, J. W. Luke, E. W. Thompson, R. H. Stone and E. E. Gillespie, D. D., and Elders M. W. Norfleet, J. C. Crawford and E. A. McNeill. The time and parts to be taken by the various members was left to the Commission.

The privilege of the floor being granted, Mr. J. C. Crawford, representing the Men of the Presbyterian Churches of Ashe County, spoke of the need of additional workers in Ashe County.

A motion was carried to the effect that as soon as possible another minister be located in Ashe County.

The Presbytery adjourned to reconvene at 8:30 A. M. The closing prayer was led by Rev. J. R. McGregor.

MORNING SESSION

At 8:30 A. M. the Presbytery was reconvened and the Devotional Exercises were conducted by Rev. J. D. Smith.

A verbal report of the Treasurer was given and was received and approved.

It was ordered that the Presbyterial Tax of the George W. Lee Memorial Church be reduced from twenty to ten dollars annually.

Minutes of the former sessions were read, corrected and approved.

The powers of an Evangelist were, upon motion, granted Rev. J. W. Luke.

Different ministers knowing our Candidates for the Ministry gave a report of their work or progress in College.

Dr. D. Clay Lilly made a verbal report on Schools and Colleges, which was adopted.

The following Churches have entered into the plan to help raise the \$3,000,000.00 necessary for the beginning of the Minister's Annuity Fund: Reynolda, Thomasville, Jefferson, Lansing, Cooleemee, Flat Rock, Collinstown, Obids, Ebenezer, Peak Creek, Low Gap, Lexington First, North Wilkesboro, Dacotah, Mt. Airy First, Yadkinville, Wilkesboro and Winston First.

The following report on Sabbath Observance and Family Religion was made by Rev. J. W. Luke and was received and approved:

It is astounding how few of the parents train their children at home and hold family worship. Another most important matter today in the changing times is the proper observance of the Sabbath Day. This is a great anchor of the Christian's faith.

In view of the importance of the proper observance of Family Religion and observance of the Sabbath, we recommend the following:

1. Each minister preach on the two subjects, Family Worship and Sabbath Observance in his church or churches.

2. That Bushnell's book, "Christian Nurture," on this subject be studied.

3. That parents teach their children the Sunday School lesson at home.

Gorrell, deceased, on Presbytery's Executive Committee on Home Missions; that Rev. J. W. Foster take the place of Rev. J. J. Douglass on the Synod's Home Missions Committee of our Executive Committee, and further that he be made Chairman; that M. A. Vickery take the place of C. V. Smith on Presbytery's Stewardship Committee; that G. W. Mountcastle, L. Vyne and W. F. Carter succeed themselves as Trustees of Glade Valley.

The Bible is still the best selling book in the world. It is the oldest Book. It is the most widely read Book. The Bible is God's Book and a knowledge of the Bible is the greatest need of the world and we rejoice to note that it has been translated into more languages and dialects than any other book.

The General Assembly has recommended that December 6, 1931 be observed as Universal Bible Sunday and we urge that this be done and that all the ministers in our Presbytery preach on that day upon some theme which will exalt the place which the Bible occupies in the propagation of the Gospel.

The Bible is at the foundation of all our work and let us support this most worthy cause with our prayers and with our gifts.

The Presbytery's Stewardship Committee made the following report, which was adopted:

The Stewardship Committee in receiving reports on Information for Stewardship Committee notes that the value of Church property is listed at \$710,700; Value of Manses \$74,000; Debt on Churches \$31,172; Debt on Manses \$4,760.

Twenty churches made the Every Member Canvass; 82 canvassers were used. Seven churches accepted in full the Benevolent Askings for the coming year. People canvassed for subscriptions—1239. In 22 churches the principles of Stewardship are taught by the pastor. A budget for the local church work and for benevolences is prepared and presented to the congregations prior to making the E. M. C. in 18 churches. Three churches met in full their askings for each benevolent cause.

Pastor's salaries promised—\$19,830. Salaries were paid fully and promptly by 11 churches. Salaries were increased by 4 churches amounting to \$330.00. Members tithing 159. Families having Family worship 118.

The benevolent quotas amount to \$27,701. (16 churches fail to give quota—hence an incomplete report). Quotas to local Church work \$33,240—(incomplete). 392 members (some churches did not give subscribers) subscribed \$17,899 to benevolences; 483 members subscribed \$31,773 for local church work.

Your committee would recommend that those churches which did not make an E. M. C. at the regular time be urged to make it at an early date.

2nd—page 387, paragraph 8—that all the Presbyteries and local churches follow the per centage adopted by the Synod in the division of Benevolent funds and at the same time carefully guard the wishes of donors in making special gifts.

3rd—page 396, paragraph 2—that Presbyteries consider the repeated requests of the General Assembly that Presbyteries use greater care than ever in receiving into the ministry of our Church men of maturer years both from other denominations and from our own membership. Also that a more intensive investigation be made of the fitness of men who appear before Presbytery as candidates for the ministry.

4th—page 412—No Minutes of Winston-Salem Presbytery were submitted to Synod for examination.

Dr. John S. Foster read the report of the Home Mission Committee, which was adopted and follows:

REPORT OF HOME MISSION COMMITTEE

Your committee feels that our Presbytery has very special reasons for gratitude and encouragement. The progress made during the past year was very marked. This report will bring evidence of the Spirit's power upon the labors of our ministers and workers. The recommendations adopted by Presbytery at our meeting a year ago

have been kept in mind and we have made honest efforts to attain them. Your committee would like to express its own appreciation of the diligence and zeal of those who are carrying this work.

For some months of the year two of our fields were vacant and one has had a supply. We hope that soon every field can have a pastor or regular supply minister. With this in view we have ministers visiting the fields, and it is hoped that by June the right ministers will have been called and in their fields. We are glad to announce that Mr. DeWitt Helm has accepted the calls of West Jefferson and Obdus Churches, and will begin serving these Churches in the early summer. The fine progress of our work in Ashe County under the ministry of Revs. R. H. Stone and J. W. Luke make the placing of another minister in the County imperative. We are happy over the demand.

The Foster Memorial Church has been organized in Ashe County, and a beautiful stone building is finished. It is said to be the most beautiful Church in the County. Rev. J. W. Foster began preaching last summer at Bixby, a small village of Davie County, held a tent meeting in the fall, and will organize a Church soon, of nearly 60 members. They are constructing a beautiful brick Church which will soon be ready for worship.

We did not succeed in having a revival campaign and Bible School in every Church last summer, partly due to the fact that two of our groups were without a minister. Though we had two less Bible Schools than the year before our enrollment and daily attendance was increased. The number of additions to our Churches was much larger than the number of other years. For this we are profoundly thankful.

We were able to close the year without a deficit. However this was due to vacant fields. Our treasurer reports that many of our smaller Churches made no contribution at all to this work. We feel that we ought to remind ourselves of the action of Presbytery that every Church, whose pastor is receiving support from this treasury, shall make a contribution. Every Church, large or small, must accept her part of this. May we urge the members of this Presbytery to personally see that this instruction of Presbytery is obeyed?

We believe that the policy of the past years is receiving the Spirit's great blessing, so following Him we recommend:—

1. That an Evangelistic campaign be conducted in every Church, during the summer months in our rural fields, unless definitely unwise in those months because of some local condition.

2. That a Daily Vacation Bible School be conducted in Every Church.

3. That the Evangelistic Campaign and Daily Vacation Bible School be conducted concurrently if possible.

4. That our ministers be persistent in finding and developing outposts for Sunday Schools and preaching service, and use the leaders of their own Churches.

5. That every Church release her pastor to conduct at least one Evangelistic Campaign within the bounds of our Presbytery during the year.

The Chairman of the Committee of the Country Church submitted the following report which was adopted:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COUNTRY CHURCH

Your Committee on Country Church presents the following report:

1. The spiritual needs of the rural sections of our country are very great. Not more than 20% of the rural population are enrolled as members of any church. There are many millions in our own Southland that are unreached by the Gospel of Christ. There are many faithful men doing all they can to meet this need, but there are far too few and more than half of the rural ministers in the South have had neither college or seminary training. The demands on the rural minister are increasing, and will continue to increase with the increase of rural high schools. An educated ministry will be demanded by an educated rural population. This presents a great opportunity to our church to give a trained ministry to the country people.

2. The country churches of our church have shown a higher average spiritual birthrate than the city churches. 92 country fields showed an average gain of 11% from additions on profession. This is about double the average for the church as a whole.

There are reasons for this, of course: first, there are more young people in rural congregations than in the city. People in the country have larger families. In the second place, the young stay for the preaching service in the country and many of them do not in the towns and cities. In the third place, there are not so many counter attractions competing with the church in the country. So there is a much better chance to win them for Christ while they are in the country than after they come to town.

3. Our own Church is largely an urban Church. 60% of the members of our church live in the cities now, and 40% live in the country. This does not tell the whole story however, for most of the important committees of the church are controlled by city men. So our church is city minded, and has not always understood the problems and opportunities of the rural church. However, we should remember that our church started as a rural church and still draws most of its new blood from the country.

4. In our Presbytery of Winston-Salem this condition exists in an exaggerated form. With a membership of more than 3500 a little over 600 are in the country churches and near 3000 in the town and

city churches. The ratio is almost 5 to 1. Yet the population of our Presbytery is largely rural. Of the 318,000 people in this Presbytery about two thirds live in the country. We are not doing our share of the country work in this Presbytery. Fine work is being done in some of the counties, but some of the most populous and wealthy counties are doing no work in the Country. If we win the country it is easier to win the town, for people are moving from the country to the towns and not from the towns to the country to any extent.

We are glad to report one country church has been organized since the meeting of Presbytery in September. This is Foster Memorial, in Ashe County.

A commission has been appointed to organize a country church at Bixby, in Davie County, where a building is under construction.

Your Standing Committee on Young People's Work submits the report of Young People's Societies.

There are 27 organizations reporting with a total membership of 739. All are under the care of the Sessions; 26 promote our Church program; they support the financial obligations assigned by the Assembly—13; Synod—10; Presbytery—10. There are 10 Young People's Councils. Twenty-one are affiliated with the Young-People-of-the-Church; 3 with Christian Endeavor.

Rev. W. T. Baker gave the report on Narrative of Christian Life and Religion, which was adopted.

From the Sessional reports on Narrative of Christian Life and Work the following report is presented:

Preaching services on the Sabbath—Twenty-one churches have 23 services each Sunday; 11 churches have 31 services each month. Sandy Ridge reports nothing. Attendance—75% at morning service, 50% at evening service, 25% at Prayer Meeting. Additions—by profession 365, by letter 130—total membership 2840. Peak Creek and Cooleemee each report 69 professions. Four churches report no professions. Additions from the Sunday School—246. Evangelistic services—23 say “Yes”; 5 say “No”. Family Altars—127; 11 churches report no altars; 2 churches report “Yes”. Communion services—24 churches report 55 services; 3 report none—average attendance 65%. Observance of the Lord’s Day—“Yes”, “Most do”, “Fairly well”. Are members faithful in presenting their children for baptism? Ten report “Yes”, 18 say “No”. Catechisms taught in the Home—12 report “Yes”; in the Sabbath School—18 report “No”. Do Sunday School pupils memorize the Scriptures?—24 report “Yes”; 4 say “No”. Principles of Stewardship are taught by the pastors in 27 churches; one church says “No”. Tithers—13 churches report 133; 13 churches report none; one church says 50%; another “Most of them do”. Every Member Canvass? “Yes” by 13 churches; 10 say “No”. Did your church accept and pay in full its apportionment for benevolent causes? Four say “Yes”, 24 report “No”. Salaries promised pastors—19 churches report \$21,785. Salary paid fully and promptly? “Yes” by 12, “No” by 6. One church increased the pastor’s salary to the amount of \$5.00. Extent of worldly conformity—6 leave the questionnaire blank and 22 say “To some extent”. Seventeen churches or pastors have done evangelistic work outside of their own churches—eleven have not. Eleven pastors and Sessions have made efforts to secure recruits for the Gospel ministry, 17 have not.

There are 36 churches and 28 reports. Those making no reports are: Rocky Ridge, First Church Winston-Salem, Danbury, Elkin, Wilkesboro, Clark Memorial, Carson Memorial and Foster Memorial.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. It is recommended that Presbytery take those churches to task for failure to make this report.

2. Three hundred and sixty-five were received on profession of faith during the year. Of this number 148 were received by two

pastors—Rev. J. W. Luke 79 and Rev. J. W. Foster 69. Two other pastors account for 45—Rev. R. L. Berry 23 and Rev. R. H. Stone 22. Rev. J. R. McGregor received 49 by profession. That leaves 123 to be divided between the other pastors—some of whom had very good results. While some reported only one or two, J. K. Flening reported 21, C. E. Clarke 18, J. W. McFall 15.

It is recommended that Winston-Salem Presbytery heartily commend these pastors for the great work they have done and urge those pastors who reported only one or two to be about the Father's business more diligently.

3. Twenty-three churches report evangelistic services followed by good results in spiritual condition of membership. It is recommended that every church hold an evangelistic meeting during the coming year.

4. It is recommended that pastors try to establish more Family Altars during the coming year.

5. It is recommended that all churches hold Communion services at least once a year and with more frequency where possible.

6. It is recommended that pastors preach sermons, and themselves set an example before their congregations, on the observance of the Lord's Day.

7. It is recommended that as far as possible pastors do some evangelistic work outside their church.

The Jefferson Presbyterian Church very cordially invited Presbytery to meet with them at the Fall meeting on September 6th. This was accepted by a rising vote.

The Executive Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief made the following report, which was adopted:

Your Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief begs to submit the following report:

The Executive Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief has faithfully endeavored to effect every possible economy in the prosecution of its work—reducing all salaries, dispensing with part of its office staff, crowding into less office space to reduce rent, cutting all appropriations to University centers for student work, to candi-

dates for the Ministry and Mission service and to the homes of our aged and infirm ministers and missionaries and needy widows and orphans of those who have died.

In the department of Education for the Ministry and Mission service aid was granted to 270 young men and women who are preparing for the ministry or mission fields. \$28,581.88 was thus loaned. Presbyteries in March 1932 reported 492 candidates for the ministry against 503 last year.

This next year the Committee finds it necessary to reduce the loan to ministerial students from \$100.00 to \$75.00.

In the department of Ministerial Relief 526 homes received \$174,627.75, which is \$9,693 less than last year.

Financial Report:—Received from all sources \$239,533.87—a decrease of \$25,000. The Committee now has a debt of \$104,447 which must be reduced by one fifth during the coming year.

The Minister's Annuity Fund has received pledges amounting to over \$900,000—of which \$345,000 has been paid in.

Local Work:—We have two candidates in the Seminary, Mr. O. W. Marshall, who appeared before you this afternoon, and Mr. M. W. Norfleet, Jr., who is doing splendid work in the Junior class there. We have one ministerial candidate at Davidson College, Mr. F. A. Watson, and we have one young lady, Miss Sarah Frances Martin, at the Assembly's Training School. Three of these young people received aid in the sum of \$300 this past year.

We have one widow, Luey Morrow of North Wilkesboro, who received \$180 from the Ministerial Relief Fund.

Recommendations:—

1st. That our ministers and people be urged to pray for the work of this Committee and for the early establishment of the Minister's Annuity Fund.

2nd. That Church treasurers be instructed to send the proper per cent of their benevolences to Christian Education and Ministerial Relief.

3rd. That Presbytery recommend Luey Morrow to receive \$180 from the funds of Ministerial Relief this coming year.

The Auditing Committee made an oral report showing that the Presbytery's Treasurer had done his work in a very excellent manner.

The report of the Executive Committee on Woman's Work was read and adopted.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON WOMAN'S WORK

The women of our Presbytery through the Woman's Auxiliaries have worked with an admirable enthusiasm and a coveted success. A few figures from their annual report show this. There are twenty two Auxiliaries with 1300 members. An interesting thing is that every local Auxiliary got their report in to the secretary, which in comparison with some church Sessions is to be praised.

Eight Auxiliaries increased their benevolent gifts by 5% or more. There are nine Home Circles and five Girl's Circles. The Business Woman's or Evening Circles are eight. There were for Foreign Missions twelve Study Classes and an equal number of Reading Circles and six Church Schools of Missions. For Home Missions there were thirteen Study Classes and twelve Reading Circles and three Church Schools of Missions. Ten Auxiliaries are in touch with the Young People in college. There are sixty-four Prayer Bands, fifty-two Auxiliary Bible Classes, two hundred and ninety-five Family Altars and two hundred and fifty-nine tithers.

Their total gifts to benevolences were \$12,319; to local church work \$1,591. The total of these gifts and other gifts is \$14,503—a decrease of \$2,066 compared with last year. This represents a per capita gift of \$11 plus.

There are four Blue Circle Auxiliaries, seven Silver Circle and two Gold Circle Auxiliaries.

It is recommended:—

First—that these women who have the progress of the Kingdom of God on their hearts be thanked and commended for their work.

Second—That pastors of Churches not having an Auxiliary make an effort, if it be practical, to get an Auxiliary organized during the year.

Third—That the admiration and greetings of the Presbytery be expressed to the Presbyterial meeting this week in Thomasville.

The report on Sabbath Schools was read, adopted and follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOLS

Your Committee would pass on to the churches the points receiv-

ing emphasis by our Assembly's Committee and urge that our constituency follow these if possible:

(1) Soul Winning should be the supreme objective of all Sunday School activities. Let the prayer, thought, and effort of every worker be centered upon this objective for the next year and we shall remove the reproach of having hundreds of schools reporting no additions to the Church on profession of faith.

(2) The publications of our own Church should be used exclusively in all our schools because, (a) They are sound in their interpretation of scripture: (b) They follow tested educational methods in bringing Christian truth and principles down to the mental level of pupils of all ages: (c) They present the doctrines, history and activities of our Church so our young people can give a reason for their faith: (d) Nothing is more dangerous for young people than literature that questions the inspiration of the Bible, raises doubts about the Virgin Birth, the Atonement, the Resurrection and teaches error in the most insidious fashion. Such literature is creeping into hundreds of our schools on the ground that the prices are low, or on the claim that they lay emphasis on certain interpretations of scripture: (e) The earnings of our periodicals are devoted to promoting the work of our own Church and aiding mission schools in a generous way.

(3) Rally Day should be observed in every school on the first Sunday in October and a generous offering should be made for Extension and Educational Work. About 50% of the total received for this work comes through the Rally Day Offering.

(4) Every self-supporting church should establish and maintain at least one out-post mission school.

The churches are disappointing in the seriousness with which they take Men's Work. Only three reports were sent in—Winston First, Geo. W. Lee Memorial and the Ashe County organization. The two former churches are operating under the Assembly plan.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Presbytery reconvened at 2:00 P. M. and was led in prayer by Rev. W. T. Baker.

A motion was carried that the Trustees of Glade Valley School be instructed to make a report at the Fall meeting of Presbytery.

The Executive Committee on Foreign Missions made its report, which was adopted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

The reports from the six countries in which our church is laboring bring encouraging news of the blessing of GOD upon our work. It seems that the very difficulties and oppositions that beset the work and the workers, have made, under the providence of God, for the furtherance of the Gospel. Increasing numbers have been added to the rolls of our churches—and while gifts to the work have fallen off in the Home Church, there has been an increase of gifts on the part of the native Christians. Sunday school enrollment has been largely increased. In some fields the day schools are overcrowded.

The amazing amount of successful hospital work done in the cure of the body is breaking down the antagonism to the Gospel as prescribed for the cure of the soul.

The only note of depression in the reports coming from the whole enterprise, comes from the Central Executive Committee at Nashville, not that these brethren are hopeless, for they are men of faith and consecration—but they face the heart-breaking fact—that falling off in receipts from the Home Church for the support of the work, predicates a large deficit. In addition to the drastic “cuts” in appropriations made at the beginning of the year, another “cut” became effective on October 1st., which involved a ten per cent reduction of the salaries of our Missionaries and appropriations for their work.

The Committee, commenting on the necessity of making these cuts says—“We can not express with what a burden of regret and reluctance these steps affecting our Missionaries were taken. We desire to record our unfeigned admiration of the splendid spirit of loyalty and devotion that has characterized their work in the face of these disappointments. They have borne them uncomplainingly, with little thought for themselves, and grieving only because of the restrictions on the work they love”. “It is heartbreaking that such reductions in the work have to be carried out in the face of a gener-

ous offering of life on the part of the young people of our church. While no attempt has been made to recruit candidates for missionary service on account of the unusual financial conditions, our records show that 36 new applications were received during the year, of whom 14 were appointed. There are now under appointment 16, with 49 new applications before the Committee. In addition to these, 367 young men and women are preparing for foreign service, intending to apply for appointment on completion of their preparation. Only three of those now under appointment are authorized to go to the field, the others being held back because of lack of funds." That paragraph makes its own appeal, there is no need of comment, save to copy from a letter from Miss Catherin Minter, Feb. 3rd, 1932. "Not long ago a native Christian heard of the 'cut' in finances. He wrote: 'I hear that native Evangelists will have to be withdrawn. I am working for the Government and receive 280 Francs each month. (This is about \$8.40) I can live on the 80, so gladly send the 200, that Evangelists may be kept among the unreached.'" This incident tells the story of the native Christian's interest in the salvation of his countrymen.

Spiritual Conditions on the field.

Outside the Church the need is desperate for a Saviour from sin. But within the Church the reports indicate a depth of spiritual life that is very gratifying. The spirit of faith-filled prayer seems to prevail throughout all the mission fields. Family worship and Bible study are emphasized as characteristic of some of the fields, resulting in quickened zeal on the part of church members toward personal work in bringing their friends to Christ.

The year has been one of real physical difficulty and hardship for our missionaries. Their privations are not revealed in their reports. They are disposed to make light of these things, but one who can read between the lines can detect something of the self-denial and sacrifice that has gone into the work. The salaries of all were cut, and the furloughs of all who were on the field were postponed for one year. Many had planned to return to home and loved ones from whom they had been separated many years. Can you imagine their sore disappointment? And yet there has been scarcely a word of complaint.

On Nov. 3rd., 1931, John W. Vinson of our North Kiangsu Mission was slain by bandits, our Church's first missionary martyr. The fine qualities of his Christian character and the unflinching bravery with which he met his death have given a light of glory on our work and added another challenging chapter to the story of the Church's advance. I've no doubt but that he was welcomed with the high tribute "Well done, good and faithful servant—enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

Just received the following from the Central Foreign Missions Committee:

The receipts for the fiscal year that has just closed were \$839,807.14. This figure was not sufficient to pay the cost of the year's work which was \$918,448.77. Obviously there would have been a deficit of \$78,641.63 but for the fact that there was a gain on account of exchange and other adjustments of \$86,015.82 which was sufficient, not only to wipe out the deficit on the year, but to enable us to reduce the total Foreign Mission debt, by \$7,374.19. In other words, whereas a year ago the Foreign Mission debt stood at \$359,277.29 it is now \$351,903.10.

Recommendations

I. That Presbytery re-affirm its faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as Head of the Church, and express our thanks for the manifest tokens of His blessings upon the work of the year just closed and ask His guidance and help for the coming year.

II. That Churches, Societies and individuals assume, wherever practicable, definite responsibility for definite parts of the Foreign Mission work.

III. That Ministers call on the Foreign Mission office to aid them, through its literature, or in any other way they can in impressing the importance of the work upon their people.

IV. That a Church School of Missions be held in every Church during January, 1933, and the last week of January be devoted as a week of prayer and self-denial for Foreign Missions and an opportunity be given the people to express their gratitude by a special offering for this cause.

V. That the Sunday Schools and Young Peoples Societies be urged to contribute to this cause, and taught to take a definite interest in the cause of Foreign Missions, as a major part of The Church's work.

The roll was called and the following were present: Ministers W. T. Baker, Chas. E. Clarke, the Moderator, J. K. Fleming, J. S. Foster, J. W. Foster, T. F. Haney, D. Clay Lilly, J. R. McGregor and R. H. Stone; Elders C. U. Davis, of Winston First; W. R. Martin, of Reynolda and J. B. Johnstone, of Mocksville.

A communication was read from Rev. J. W. Luke asking that the pastoral relationship between him and the Obids Church be dissolved. His reason was that his field was too large and he wanted to be relieved of this in order that the congregation might call Mr. DeWitt F. Helm. The congregation concurred in this request.

Upon motion this request was granted—effective at this meeting.

A communication was read from Rev. R. H. Stone asking that the pastoral relationship between him and the West Jefferson Church be dissolved. The reason given was that in an expanding work another minister was needed and that he wanted to be relieved of this work in order that the congregation might issue a call to Mr. D. F. Helm. The congregation concurred in this request. Upon motion this relationship was dissolved effective as of March 31st, 1932.

It was reported that the membership of the Presbytery was now 4,027 and that Presbytery could elect additional Commissioners to the General Assembly. Presbytery then

elected as Principals Dr. D. Clay Lilly and Ruling Elder C. M. Norfleet and as Alternates Rev. W. T. Baker and Ruling Elder R. B. Sanford.

The Presbyterian Dismission of Rev. W. I. Howell, Jr., of Kanawha Presbytery to the Presbytery of Winston-Salem was read. Mr. Howell was examined as to his experimental religion by the Moderator. This was voted satisfactory

The examinations in Theology and Church Government were conducted by Dr. D. Clay Lilly. Upon separate motions these were accepted as satisfactory. Another motion was carried which approved the examinations as a whole.

A motion was made and Mr. Howell was received and welcomed into the Presbytery of Winston-Salem.

A call was read and found in order from the Mocksville Presbyterian Church for the pastoral services of Rev. W. I. Howell, Jr. The call was placed in Mr. Howell's hands and he signified his acceptance of the call.

The Moderator appointed the following Commission to install Mr. Howell pastor of the Mocksville Church:—Dr. J. R. McGregor, Chairman, who will preside and propound the Constitutional Questions, Rev. W. T. Baker to charge the pastor, Rev. J. K. Fleming to preach the sermon, Rev. J. W. Foster, alternate, Elder G. W. Mountcastle to charge the congregation, and Elder J. B. Johnstone.

The time of the installation to be arranged by the Chairman in conference with the pastor.

The Minutes were read and adopted.

After a prayer led by Dr. McGregor the Presbytery was adjourned.

MINUTES

The Presbytery of Winston-Salem met in its Nineteenth Stated Meeting in the Jefferson Presbyterian Church at 11:00 A. M. September 6, 1932. In the absence of the retiring Moderator a former Moderator—Rev. John D. Smith—presided. Rev. W. T. Baker preached the opening sermon from the text John 15:4.

Presbytery was called to order and the prayer was led by Rev. C. W. Robinson.

The roll was called and the following were present:

Ministers—Revs. W. T. Baker, J. K. Fleming, D. F. Helm, J. W. Luke, J. W. McFall, J. R. Offield, C. W. Robinson, J. D. Smith and R. H. Stone.

Elders—D. C. Bare, Ebenezer; E. A. McNeill, Jefferson; J. R. Weaver, Lansing; W. W. Burke, Mt. Airy First; S. C. Stewart, North Wilkesboro; R. M. Shives, Geo. W. Lee Memorial; J. C. Crawford, Obids; C. M. Norfleet, Reynolda; F. C. Howard, Thomasville; E. L. Anderson, Winston First.

Rev. W. T. Baker was elected Moderator and Rev. J. W. McFall was elected Temporary Clerk.

Elder A. R. Vail, of Jefferson, in a few well chosen words, presented the Moderator with a gavel made of walnut wood that came from the home of the late Mrs. Elizabeth Neal Foster.

Upon motion the following ministers were excused from attending this meeting of Presbytery: Revs. Chas. E. Clarke, J. S. Foster, D. Clay Lilly and J. R. McGregor.

Mr. C. M. Norfleet and Revs. C. W. Robinson and J. K. Fleming were appointed by the Moderator to draft a resolution in regard to the failure of our churches to be represented at Presbytery.

Rev. Jas. E. Baxter, a member of the Presbytery of North and South Carolina, was introduced to Presbytery and invited to sit as a visiting brother.

The following schedule of meeting was adopted: Recess at 12:30 P. M. Reconvene at 1:30 P. M. and adjourn at 4:30 P. M. Reconvene at 7:30 P. M. and adjourn at will. Presbytery accepted the invitation of the Foster Memorial Church to hold its Wednesday morning session there at 9:00 A. M.

A communication from the Scholastic Committee of the Board of Trustees of Union Theological Seminary was read and referred to the Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief.

Communications from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly in regard to amendments to the Book of Church Order were read and referred to a special committee consisting of Revs. J. W. Foster, J. D. Smith and Elder C. M. Norfleet.

A communication from the Assembly's Committee on Evangelism was referred to Presbytery's Evangelistic Committee.

Charlie Weaver, a member of the Lansing Presbyterian Church, came before Presbytery and asked that he be received as a candidate for the Ministry. A letter of commendation from the Session of the Lansing Church was read. Rev. C. W. Robinson examined him on experimental religion and motives for entering the ministry. The Moderator asked the constitutional questions. He was received under the care of Presbytery and there was a special prayer.

Rev. R. L. Berry and Elder H. D. Munroe, of Flat Rock Church, and Elder H. M. Joyce, of the Danbury Church, were enrolled.

Presbytery took recess until 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION

At 1:30 P. M. Presbytery was reconvened and opened with prayer.

Rev. J. W. McFall read the report of the Committee on Schools and Colleges. Upon motion this was adopted and follows:

REPORT ON COMMITTEE OF SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

There are three principal sources of income for the schools under our care.

I. The fees received from the students. These pay only a part of the cost of the pupil's education.

II. Gifts from the Church. These are necessary to the existence of such institutions.

III. The income from endowments. Most of our schools do not have endowments large enough to pay much of their annual budget.

These three sources of income are all being decreased these last years. Reduced tuition fees and smaller number of students and more loss in collecting what is due the schools from the students are all causing a very great pressure on the finances of our institutions.

The gifts from the churches have been decreasing for some years. The endowments are not seriously disturbed as yet, though in a few cases, the income from the investment has been diminished.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I. We recommend that the Presbytery call upon our Ministers to aggressively set before their people the claims of all our schools and colleges.

II. That they endeavor to persuade our boys and girls to attend our own institutions of learning.

III. That each Session see to it that an offering is taken for the Synod's Cause of Schools and Colleges and that a special offering for Glade Valley High School is made each year.

The above report was followed by that of the Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief, which was adopted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION
AND MINISTERIAL RELIEF

Your Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief begs to submit the following report:

We believe that the Executive Committee of Christian Education and Ministerial Relief has made the utmost efforts to effect economies and reduce expenditures. The office expense has been reduced. Loans to students have been reduced. The amounts sent to needy ministers, their widows and orphans have been scaled four times in the past two years, and these meagre amounts will shortly be further reduced.

Yet notwithstanding these economies the Executive Committee closed this past year with a debt of \$104,000. This indebtedness is due to decreased contributions and increased needs.

For several years this Committee has received a smaller proportionate part of the General Assembly's askings than any other Assembly's Committee. This past year the various Presbyteries contributed \$141,000, but this Committee had to send to the various Presbyteries \$246,000; \$105,000 more than was contributed by the Presbyteries.

Believing that the care of the disabled ministers, their widows and orphans, is of major importance, your Committee earnestly makes the following recommendations:

1st. Urge your Church Treasurer to see that a proportionate part of the benevolent contributions of your church be sent to the Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief.

2nd. Give your Church an opportunity to make a supplementary offering to this cause in December as has been ordered by the General Assembly.

3rd. Pray for God's blessing and counsel upon the Executive Committee.

4th. We further recommend that those Churches which have not contributed to the Minister's Annuity Fund, should do so as soon as possible.

5th. We further recommend that Presbytery endorse an application of Mrs. Bettie Carter Mebane for \$240.00 from the Ministerial Relief Fund.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE

Your Committee on Bible Cause would make the following report:

The American Bible Society is now 116 years old and has distributed 238,600,000 volumes of Scripture. This distribution has been in over three hundred languages. During the year 1931 the Society distributed 9,375,000 copies, Testaments and portions throughout the United States and in over fifty foreign countries. There was a decrease in distribution from the previous year.

The Society reports that there was a most notable increase in the circulation of Scriptures in Japan. The distribution of Bible and Testaments held up well to the level of previous years, while that of the Gospels and other portions increased more than 300,000.

The General Assembly has designated December 4, 1932 as Universal Bible Sunday and we recommend that this be done.

A knowledge of the Bible is the great need of the human race. The Bible is God's Book and is the foundation of all our work. We urge that this most worthy cause be supported by our prayers and by our gifts.

The Treasurer of Presbytery made an oral report in which he stated that the Treasury is about depleted and stressed the need of the Churches paying their Presbytery's tax.

Rev. R. H. Stone read the report of the Trustees of the Glade Valley School, which, upon motion, was adopted.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF GLADE VALLEY SCHOOL

To the Presbytery of Winston-Salem, meeting in the Jefferson Presbyterian Church Sept. 6, 7, 1932:

Brethren:

The Trustees of the Glade Valley School, thinking that you would be especially interested in the financial report of the school, submit to you the report of Rev. S. M. Rankin made to our Board on July 8, 1932. The following was adopted and ordered filed as a part of our Minutes:

TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF GLADE VALLEY SCHOOL

The R. K. Smith fund of \$10,000.00 was invested in a real estate bond on C. G. Wright's property on N. Elm Street. This lot has 45 front feet, and the total amount of the bonds was \$34,000.00. All the bond holders agreed to sell the lot, and take one loss rather than continue to hold and pay taxes and still lose our interest. The property brought \$20,979.36 net, and our part was \$6,170.40. This was paced in the Morris' Plan Bank on Oct. 11, 1931. On October 30th I made a loan to Mr. John Hanner of \$2800.00 taking a mortgage, on three store rooms, a dwelling and a filling station in Glenwood. The other \$3370.40 remains in the Morris Plan Bank at five per cent.

The Kent Fund of \$5,000.00 was invested in a real estate bond on the T. J. Pickard's Dairy Farm of 275 acres, located eight miles south east of Greensboro. There is only one other bond of \$2000.00 on this farm. The land cost Mr. Pickard over \$10,000.00 and the \$7000.00 he borrowed was expended for buildings on the farm. Mr. Pickard died two months ago and we are now having trouble with this. We are hoping to get Mr. Sam Thacker to take over the entire place on a lease for a sufficient amount to pay the interest, taxes and insurance.

The Million Dollar fund of \$1,500.00, the Jennie Gilmer fund of \$500.00 and the Williamson fund of \$1,000.00 was lumped together, making \$3,000.000. This was invested in a real estate bond on Sedgefield, Inc. There is a total of \$65,000.00 on 578 acres. The Sedgefield Inc. is now in the hands of receivers and we do not know what the outcome will be.

The total of the Blackwood Fund is \$3900.00. \$3500.00 of this was invested in a real estate bond on W. F. Clegg's lot of 22 front feet on S. Elm St. The total bonds on this lot was \$10,000.00. He was not able to pay interest or taxes, so the bondholders got together and decided to have the property sold and buy it, which we did. I had to pay as our part of the expense of repairs to the building \$98.64, and our part of the taxes for 1929, \$156.42.

The store room, shop and rear lot is now rented at \$80.00 per month. If we are able to collect the rents we will be able to pay the interest, taxes and insurance.

\$400.00 of the Blackwood fund was invested in a real estate bond on the home of R. E. Hodgkin, located on Spring Garden St. The total of the bonds on this lot is \$1500.00, Mr. Hodgkin has agreed to pay this bond off at the rate of \$50.00 per month. He has already made two payments.

The Louise Ervin fund of \$100.00 is loaned with the \$400.00 to Mr. Hodgkin, making our bond on him \$500.00.

The Oak Ridge Institute bond for \$100.00 given by Mr. R. R. King is intact, and we have been able to collect the dividend.

The Liggett and Myers bond of \$1000.00 given by Mr. J. S. Cobb is intact and we have been able to collect the dividend.

Presbytery's Committee on Evangelism read a communication from the Assembly's Committee on Evangelism. Then the Presbytery entered into an enthusiastic discussion of evangelism in general and evangelism for 1933 in particular. A motion was made and carried that Presbytery enter whole heart-

edly into the Evangelistic campaign for 1933 and adopt as our slogan "Pray—Plan—Witness". A deeply spiritual season of prayer was engaged in for God's blessing upon our evangelistic efforts.

Rev. J. W. Luke presented a petition signed by a number of Christians at Laurel Fork asking for the organization of a Presbyterian Church. A fine group of people from that community appeared in person at the meeting of Presbytery. The petition is as follows:

The petition was granted and the following Commission was appointed to organize a Church in the Laurel Forks community: Revs. R. H. Stone, C. W. Robinson, J. W. McFall with R. L. Berry and D. F. Helm as alternates and Elders Don Bare and J. C. Crawford with Jesse Baker as alternate.

The Moderator appointed the following Committee to revise the Manual of Presbytery and to report at the next Stated Meeting: Revs. R. H. Stone and J. S. Foster and Elders C. M. Norfleet and E. L. Anderson.

Elder E. L. Anderson, authorized by the Session of the First Presbyterian Church of Winston-Salem, invited Presbytery to meet in their Church for the Spring meeting. The invitation was unanimously accepted.

Rev. C. W. Robinson made the report for Presbytery's Executive Committee on Foreign Missions. The report was adopted and follows:

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Communications from the Central Executive Committee brings, "three things that stand out conspicuously in the foreign landscape."

1. The unprecedented spiritual opportunity that confronts us around the world. Practically every mail from over seas brings to us new testimonies to the open heartedness of the people to the gospel of our Savior. Wearied with unbelief, restive and disillusioned there is a reaching out on the part of the masses of the earth for that peace and assurance and certainty that only Christ can bring. Reports from the field tell glowing stories of the conquests of the gospel where it is being preached with apostolic power and effect.

CHINA

We have the report that hundreds of new inquirers have just been enrolled in nearly all the stations. Large new districts without a single Christian, have been opened. The friendliness of the people as a whole is wonderful.

JAPAN

Notwithstanding the dangers that attend a mass movement toward Christianity, we look forward with hope and joy to the time when multitudes will welcome our message and turn unto the Lord.

BRAZIL

Notwithstanding the depression has been keenly felt in every department of the work. The entire field is prospering amazingly well. The drought and the consequent suffering have opened the eyes of the people to the real character of the priests and the Roman Church. In all the people's suffering that Church has not lifted a hand to help. Their charges for baptisms, marriages, extreme unction etc., etc., etc., are still the same and the people are turning to us and giving us an attentive and sympathetic ear. This is all that the gospel needs. If a man will listen the Holy Spirit convicts and converts. Never was there a greater opportunity for our work. Everywhere doors hitherto closed are wide open to us.

KOREA

The past year has been unusually severe for the Koreans. Our mission has been compelled to labor under the handicap of a greatly depleted budget which from April of this year, has been only about 48 per cent of what we received three years ago. Yet

despite these and other serious difficulties the work has unquestionably made good progress. Our schools have the largest enrollment in many years. Our Christian hospitals are continuing a splendid ministry of healing and evangelism. The purely evangelistic work is growing.

MEXICO

The times are right here in Mexico for an enlarged interest in the call which Christ makes to all men. The churches are active and the great masses of the people are ready to listen to anyone who will help them solve the problems of their reaction to God.

AFRICA

The evident interest among the native women in the gospel is one of the decidedly encouraging features of a seeming awakening among all the natives.

One instance of this; Mrs. Crane was asked to talk to the Woman's Auxiliary of one of the local stations with out-station women as visitors. She had 570 women in her audience. And so we find very many encouraging features of the work in all six of the foreign mission fields.

2. The imperative need for an immediate restoration of our appropriations to our missionaries and their work. The successive reductions in our work have been met heroically and bravely by our missionaries. But it is only fair to warn the Church that the danger line has been reached. The fact that our work has not suffered greater damage has been due to the unselfishness of our missionaries who have kept the work alive only by heroic sharing of their own personal salaries with the needs about them. Many of them have given all that they had and have wept because they had no more to offer. But we upon whom the responsibility rests must see that the appropriations for them and for their work are restored to the point of adequacy at the earliest possible moment.

3. There is great need for courage and vision on the part of the leadership of the Home Church. Surely Church leadership should be as courageous as business leadership. Just at this time all around us, business men are going ahead reemploying hundreds and thousands of people, spending vast sums of money because of their confidence in the future of America. Surely we cannot be less courageous who have put our faith in the living God.

OUR PRESENT FINANCIAL SITUATION

The receipts for the first four months of our Church year from April 1, 1932 to July 1, 1932 were \$165,936.46. This represents a decrease of \$18,089.22 as compared with the receipts for the same period of last year. We must begin to build up these receipts at once.

The spending budget for foreign missions for the current Church year April 1, 1932 to March 31, 1933 was fixed by the General Assembly in May at \$784,00.00. This is approximately \$400,000.00 less than the amount actually expended two years ago.

PROMPT REMITTANCES

In order to save the unnecessary spending of thousands of dollars in interest our church treasurers are asked to make prompt remittances of all benevolent contributions to the foreign mission work.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Presbytery record its feeling that, as heretofore, so also now, the preaching of the gospel to all the world should be the primary emphasis of the church and that this be kept constantly in mind especially during these days when decreasing appropriations are necessitating the radical curtailment of the church's work.

2. That churches, societies and individuals assume, wherever practicable, definite responsibility for definite parts of the foreign mission work.

3. That all Sunday Schools be urged this year to assume as their specific foreign mission responsibility some part of the \$60,000.00 being raised for our work in Korea.

4. That the Presbytery commend to the Young People's Societies as their foreign mission objective the \$6,000.00 for the expenses of the Graybill Industrial School for Boys and the Centenarista School for Girls in Mexico.

5. That every Church in the Presbytery be asked to observe January 22 to 29 as the week of Prayer and self denial for foreign missions, and that all sessions be urged to arrange for a special offering for foreign missions in the churches in January. Inasmuch as we have no study book on missions this year it is the more imperative that Pastors keep this important matter continually before the people.

The following Commission was appointed to organize a Church, in accord with the above petition, if the way be clear: Revs. Wm. T. Baker, D. F. Helm, C. W. Robinson and E. E. Gillespie and J. W. Luke as alternate; Elders Victor Clark and E. A. McNeill.

The Commission appointed to organize a Church at Bixby made the following report, which was adopted.

REPORT OF THE COM. TO ORGANIZE A CHURCH AT BIXBY

At 3:00 P. M. Sept. 4, 1932 the Commission to organize a Church at Bixby, N. C., met in the handsome new Church which is in process of construction. The following members of the Commission were present: Revs. J. R. McGregor, W. T. Baker, and J. K. Fleming, with Ruling Elders C. M. Norfleet and E. L. Gaither. Rev. E. E. Gillespie, D D., a member of Orange Presbytery, was invited to sit with the Commission. A large congregation was present.

The Commission was called to order and constituted with prayer. Rev. J. K. Fleming was appointed Clerk. Dr. J. R. McGregor presided. Rev. W. T. Baker preached the sermon, using as his text John 12:24.

The following were received into Church membership on profession of faith in Christ, and were baptized by the Pastor, Rev. J. W. Foster (See roll of charter members). It was found that the Charter membership of the new Church constituted a congregation of 62 persons.

The Constitutional questions were asked by Dr. McGregor, and the Church was formally organized.

It was thought best by the Pastor to postpone till a later date the election of Elders and Deacons, and the Commission concurred with him in this decision.

The work of the Commission being completed, it was adjourned with prayer and the benediction.

Upon motion Presbytery clothed Rev. J. W. Foster with the powers of an evangelist in order that he might more effectively carry on his work.

The report of the Presbytery's Executive Committee on Stewardship was made and adopted and is as follows:

REPORT OF THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

Your Committee on Stewardship would submit the following report. We note the fact that the General Assembly's plans for the work of 1933-34 has reduced the total askings on Benevolences from \$2,500,000.00 to \$2,000,000.00.

We would also call attention to the distressing deficits which continue in the present year's work, and that from April 1st to August 1st, 1932 there has been contributed to the four Executive Committees of Foreign Missions, Assembly's Home Missions, Religious Education, Christian Education and Ministerial Relief \$46,527.00 less than was contributed to that work during the same period last year.

But we are confident that God has seen the travail of His Church, and that He will honor and bless the faithful work of His people. In that spirit therefore, we should look with renewed faith and assurance to Him who is the Great Head of the Church.

The following recommendations are submitted.

1. That every Church be urged to make an Every Member Canvass both for Local Church Expenses and Church Benevolences on Sunday March 19, 1933.

2. That Pastors and Church Officers definitely prepare for the Every Member Canvass by a program of intense cultivation including study, inspiration, and earnest prayer for a period of at least six weeks prior to the Every Member Canvass.

3. That the necessity for an Every Member Canvass for both Current Expenses and Benevolences be brought to the attention of the small and vacant Churches, and that some provision be made for seeing that these Churches receive the necessary assistance in this endeavor.

4. That as heretofore, a Called Meeting of Presbytery be held at Yadkinville for the purpose of considering the work of our Church, and planning for the Every Member Canvass.

5. That Pastors and Church Officers be urged not to grant immunity from further financial appeals during the year in view of the fact that the Benevolent Budget represents only the Church's minimum needs, and makes no provision whatever for such emergencies as God in His wisdom may see fit to thrust upon us from time to time,

6. That Presbytery call the Churches attention to the Assembly-Wide Evangelistic Campaign of 1933. That in connection with this campaign Pastors and Officers make every effort possible to enlist the Church members as tithers or proportionate givers, and that proportionate

giving be presented as a normal part of the Christian's service to his Lord and his Church.

7. That the new book prepared by Rev. Roswell C. Long, "The Story of Our Church," be commended to all our Churches and the leaders in all their organizations, that its message may be read and studied as widely as possible.

8. That the General Assembly's Church Calendar of Special Days and Special Seasons for our Church for the years 1932-33 and 1933-34 be adopted.

The Minutes of the morning and afternoon sessions were read and adopted. After a prayer Presbytery took recess until 7:30 P. M.

EVENING SESSION

Presbytery was reconvened at 7:30 P. M. for a popular meeting in the interest of Presbytery's Home Missions. Presbytery had the pleasure of having Rev. D. S. McCarty, of Galax, Va., who preached a sermon from Mark 16:19-20.

Rev. J. K. Fleming, presiding, read the report of the Presbytery's Home Mission Committee, which follows:

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE

The five months of this Church year have been most fruitful in every part of our work. Our ministers and workers are greatly encouraged and inspired by the Spirit's blessing upon their Daily Bible Schools and evangelistic campaigns. We are able to report three more such Bible Schools and evangelistic campaigns than we could last year, and there will be conducted soon two more revivals. During the summer our Churches have held 26 Bible Schools and 24 evangelistic campaigns. We have had enrolled in the Bible Schools 2,524 children. There have been approximately 300 professions of faith in Christ made in the revivals, and we have received into the Presbyterian Churches 239 on profession of faith in Christ and 43 by statement of certificate of membership in other Churches. In these Bible Schools we have had 81 workers. Our Committee of Religious Education helps us to have three young women of the Assembly's Training School, Misses Kathryn Hunt, Sarah Frances Martin, and Margaret McMullin. These have done most excellent work and we are especially grateful to them

and the large corps of workers who have assisted them. In our evangelistic campaigns we have had 23 ministers. Our own ministers have given freely and fully of themselves for these services.

The above facts are an increase over the report of a year ago. Last year we only had 23 Bible Schools and 17 evangelistic campaigns. Also the additions were 190 on profession of faith in Christ and 14 by statement of certificate of membership in other Churches.

The Rev. and Mrs. DeWitt Helm have entered enthusiastically into the West Jefferson group opportunity and have been most cordially received. All reports from them and the field gave assurance of great things for the future. Rev. C. W. Ervin has had a good summer as supply minister for the Glade Valley field, and Mr. O. W. Marshall reports satisfactory progress in the Danbury group which he is supplying. We regret that the Yadkinville Group continues vacant.

Your committee keenly regrets that our Synod's Committee on Home Missions found it imperative to reduce their appropriation to our Presbytery. Also the General Assembly's Home Mission Committee had to reduce their appropriation. This adds to the task of adequately supporting our workers. We are constrained to urge all of our Churches to remember that the smallest as well as the largest must support in full this part of our work. Your apportionment to the Home Mission Committee may be small but it is vital to us. Will each of us not earnestly endeavor to have our Church contribute their share? Our treasurer, Mr. J. H. Thompson reports this morning, September 5th, that he has not been able to send out the checks for August salaries.

It seems to us that our opportunities are greater than ever for extending the power of the Kingdom of Christ. Our ministers and workers have been most sacrificial and zealous. The great Head of the Church has opened the door for us, and His Spirit is making effective the proclaiming of the gospel by them. We praise our Lord for their labors and commend them to Him for His greatest blessing and reward.

We earnestly request every Church which has not had an evangelistic campaign to have one this Church year. Also let us begin to make plans for our next summer campaigns.

The Home Mission report was adopted. Presbytery was adjourned with prayer, led by Rev. W. I. Howell, to meet in the Foster Memorial Church for the morning session.

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

Presbytery was reconvened in the Foster Memorial Presbyterian Church at 9:30 A. M. Rev. W. I. Howell conducted the devotional exercises.

Elder N. W. Graham, of the Foster Memorial Church, was enrolled and extended a welcome to the Presbytery.

Rev. Eli Graham, of the Macedonia Baptist Church, was introduced to Presbytery and invited to sit as a visiting brother.

The special Committee appointed by the Moderator to draft a resolution in regard to non-representation at Presbytery reported as follows:

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON ATTENDANCE

The Presbytery regrets the necessity of recording a very large number of absentees at this meeting, the roll call showing only forty per cent of those who should constitute this meeting, being present. This apparent lack of interest in our Church courts should challenge the serious thought of our ministers and elders.

We urge our ministers to prayerfully consider the seriousness of this situation and to present the matter to their sessions, earnestly seeking their support in an effort to make our future meetings really representative.

Since our Book of Church Order provides no excuse for non-attendance on Church courts, we urge our ministers and elders to present no excuse for absence that they cannot conscientiously give to the Great Head of the Church.

Further, that the Clerk be instructed to send a copy of this resolution to each minister in the Presbytery with instructions that he read it at the meeting of his Session.

The Standing Committee on Assembly's Minutes made the following report, which was adopted:

REPORT ON MINUTES OF THE ASSEMBLY

Your Committee after a perusal of the Minutes of the last General Assembly would submit the following report:

On page 57 we note that the Assembly appointed an Ad Interim Committee to study the subject of training men for the ministry and plan for reducing the number of Theological Seminaries.

We would call your attention to page 67 Minutes of the Assembly with reference to the discontinuance of the Departments of Country Church Work and Men's Work and the consolidation of that work with the work of the Committee of Religious Education.

3. That we do not look with favor on the suggestion that an emergency Assembly of a bare quorum be held—or if held, that this quorum should be made up from the Synods of North Carolina, South Carolina, Appalachia, Virginia and West Virginia.

4. That the General Assembly shall not so much consider how quickly they can finish the work of the Assembly—as how well they can do it in whatever time it may require for its thorough consideration.

The following report of the Committee on Country Church was read an adopted:

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON COUNTRY CHURCH

Your Committee on the Country Church has the following report to make: There was referred to us a communication from the Director of the Country Church Work. We approve of recommendations one and two as prepared by Dr. H. W. McLaughlin and recommend that the dates for these conferences and places of meeting be left to the joint committee provided for.

The recommendations referred to above are:

1. That other Presbyteries follow the example of Winchester, Mecklenburg and Fayetteville, and provide for their leadership all-day conferences on Country Church Work, Religious Education and Evangelism. Such conferences should be under the joint direction of the Committee of Religious Education and Evangelism and that Evangelism be stressed in these local conferences.

2. That, in order that self-support be provided, a new plan of finance and a more efficient program should be put into practice in our rural churches. To attain this goal, each of our Presbyteries is requested to place country church ministers and elders on its committees.

Rev. R. H. Stone certified to the Presbytery that in March 1932 he had moderated a congregational meeting in the Low Gap Church in which the following actions were taken: the congregation concurred with their pastor—Rev. J. W. Luke—that the pastoral relationship be dissolved; that the congregation made a call according to Book of Church Order for the pastoral services of Mr. D. F. Helm. Later the congregation decided that it would be better for Mr. Luke to remain their pastor for a time. Mr. Luke agreed to this. But that for a number of months Mr. Helm has been acceptably serving the Low Gap Church and wants him for their pastor. The request to Presbytery to dissolve the pastoral relationship and the call for Mr. Helm's services have been lost.

Presbytery acted upon these as though they were present. Upon motion the pastoral relationship between the Low Gap Church and Rev. J. W. Luke was dissolved.

The call for the pastoral services of Rev. D. F. Helm was referred to the Committee on 'Calls and Supplies.

The Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief, through its chairman Rev. J. W. McFall, made the following report which, upon motion, was adopted:

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND MINISTERIAL RELIEF

Your Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief begs to submit the following report:

This past year has been one of the most difficult years that our General Assembly's Executive Committee of C. E. and M. R. has every faced.

Last year the General Assembly directed this committee not to add further to their debt and furthermore they were directed to pay five percent on the accumulated debt of \$104,447. For the year 1932-33, the General Assembly allowed this Committee a spending budget of \$270,081. The Committee, appreciating the critical financial situation of the country, appropriated and spent \$69,504.69 less than the "Spending Budget". It cut to the quick all administration expenses, reduced salaries 33 1-3 per cent; dispensed with some of the office staff; crowded into less space to save rent; reduced and then cut off appropriations for student work at University centers; reduced the amounts appropriated to candidates for the ministry and for the fifth time in two years reduced the appropriations to the homes of the aged and infirm ministers.

Near the close of the year, it was decided not to send the last payment of 30 per cent of the amount appropriated to the candidates for the ministry; it was also decided that it would be impossible to send the March payment to the homes of the aged and infirm ministers, missionaries and widows.

Notwithstanding these economies, \$2,046.45 has been added to the accumulated debt. This amount together with 5 per cent of the accumulated debt must be paid before any further payments will go to the homes of our Ministers and widows.

LOCAL WORK

We have five candidates for the ministry as follows: O. W. Marshall who is engaged in Home Mission work at Danbury. M. W. Norfleet Jr., who is in the middle class at Union Seminary. The officials at the Seminary state that Mr. Norfleet is doing excellent work and shows great promise of usefulness in the Master's Kingdom. Mr. F. A. Watson, who is at Davidson and Mr. Chas. Weaver, who is at Lees McRae College. Mr. Blair Gwyn, our recent candidate, is a Senior at Davidson College.

We have two widows of ministers in our Presbytery who are receiving aid from the Ministerial Relief Fund. Mrs. B. W. Mebane, of Mount Airy and Mrs. Lucy Morrow, of North Wilkesboro.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That our Ministers and Churches be urged to pray for God's guidance and for the Church's support of the work of this Committee.
2. That Church Treasurers be instructed to send the proper per cent of their benevolences to this Cause.
3. That Presbytery recommend Lucy Morrow to receive \$144.00 and Mrs. B. W. Mebane \$216.00.

Mr. E. B. Eldridge gave an oral report on the condition at Glade Valley School. Mr. Ben Osborne a patron of the School, spoke of the value of the school from the standpoint of a father of two students. Glenn Tolliver, a graduate of the school, spoke of the value of the institution from the standpoint of a student.

Presbytery received these reports as information and expressed its gratitude to each speaker.

Upon motion Presbytery took recess to reconvene at 7:45 P. M.

EVENING SESSION

The Presbytery was reconvened at 7:55 P. M. and the opening prayer was led by Rev. C. W. Robinson. The Moderator announced that the evening session would be devoted to a popular meeting in the interest of Home Missions.

Elder W. F. Carter was asked to act as Chairman in the absence of Dr. J. R. McGregor—Chairman of Presbytery's Home Mission Committee. A very educational, inspirational and challenging program was given by the Home Mission workers of the Presbytery. Rev. D. F. Helm spoke on "The Challenge of Home Missions". Rev. J. W. Foster used as his topic "Home Missions at Our Door". Revs. R. H. Stone, R. L. Berry and J. W. Luke told of the work that was being done in their respective fields.

The report of the Home Mission Committee was adopted as read by Mr. Carter and follows:

REPORT OF HOME MISSION COMMITTEE

We have had a good year. Our workers, our Churches, and your committee have many evidences of our Master's great blessing upon the work He has committed to us. Our ministers and workers have manifested a real sacrificial spirit in the manner in which they have accepted decreased means of support, and in their spiritual enthusiasm for their work. They have given themselves devotedly to their fields of labor and have undertaken in many places to build upon no other man's foundation, pushing vigorously out into communities where there appeared to be an open door. In every group there are marked evidences of a willingness to go forward.

The minutes of our fall meeting of Presbytery contain our report covering the Daily Bible Schools and many evangelistic meetings. We believe that it should be repeated. We had conducted 26 Bible Schools and 24 evangelistic campaigns. In the Bible Schools there were enrolled 2,524 children. Approximately 300 people confessed our Christ as Saviour, and 239 united with our Churches on profession of Him, and 43 by letter or statement. In these Schools and campaigns we had 81 workers. We believe this is the largest number won in any one year of the life of our Presbytery. For this we are profoundly grateful to our Lord.

Rev. J. P. Taylor, Jr., is serving the Church at Yadkinville and Wilkesboro. This leaves only one Church without regular preaching services.

Your committee regrets that it cannot plan to have directors and helpers for our Bible Schools this summer. Our finances will not permit us to secure them, however much we desire to and appreciate the great work of such. We are urging that we have a Bible School and Evangelistic Service in every Church. In this year of "Evangelism" we should seek with more zeal to win every unsaved man and woman, boy and girl, within each of every Church. It is hoped and believed that each of our ministers will overcome this loss of especially trained helpers and use volunteer helpers to have the Bible Schools. Your committee urges and insists upon this.

Our Treasurer's report, given below presents to us the necessity of every Church carrying their full share of this cause. It will be necessary for us to remain upon a cash basis. Banks will no longer loan us any money for salaries. If the gifts are not sent regularly it will only mean that our ministers and workers can not receive their money for living expenses. Will every Church not send its part however small it may be?

We would ask that our Presbytery, ministers and elders, covenant together to pray regularly for this great cause.

Dr. J. S. Foster announced that Mr. S. D. Gordon would have charge of the devotional exercises in the morning and that the Presbyterian Communion would be observed at 11:00 A. M.

Presbytery was adjourned with prayer to meet at 9:00 A. M. in the morning.

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

Presbytery was reconvened according to adjournment. Mr. S. D. Gordon conducted the devotional exercises and led Presbytery in prayer. The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The time for the examination of Candidate O. W. Marshall having arrived Presbytery, through Dr. Lilly, proceeded to examine him on Theology, Church Government and the Sacraments. Presbytery voted not to sustain his examination.

Presbytery took recess until eleven o'clock in order that the Communion Table might be prepared.

Presbytery was reconvened at the appointed time for celebration of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Revs. R. L. Berry and J. K. Fleming and Elders L. Vyne, J. R. Weaver, J. B. Johnstone and I. P. Graham administered the sacrament.

Presbytery then proceeded to its regular business. Mr. I. P. Graham, a Trustee of Davidson College, made an oral report and answered questions concerning the college.

The Stewardship Committee reported on the communication from the Assembly's Committee on Stewardship and Finance. This report was accepted as information.

The report of the Stewardship Committee was made by Rev. J. K. Fleming and was adopted and follows:

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Your Committee on Stewardship submits its report with a feeling of gratitude to God for His goodness and His manifold blessings upon all the work of our Church. While the severe economic conditions have been keenly felt by all groups and classes of our people, yet they have continued to manifest a beautiful and sacrificial spirit in the service of our Master. And had it not been for their continued loyalty to the causes of Christ, the financial retrenchments in all lines of our work would have been much deeper than they are.

Concerning the work in our Presbytery, we note that many reports are incomplete. Therefore, we cannot give an adequate summary of results. Nine Churches reported that they paid their pastor's salary promptly and fully while twenty-two churches reported that they had not paid salaries promptly and fully.

Six Churches paid their Benevolent Askings in full; twenty-three Churches did not pay their Benevolent Askings in full.

Reports showed that there are in the Presbytery 160 tithers and 117 Family Altars.

Three hundred and fifty-two persons made subscriptions in the Every Member Canvass, pledging \$2,351.00 to Benevolences and \$17,190.00 to Current Expenses. Eighteen Churches reported that they did not make the Every Member Canvass.

The following recommendations are submitted:

1. We desire to commend those Churches that are using the "pay in kind" plan as a means of developing the grace of Christian Stewardship, and would recommend this plan to every Church where it would seem to be workable.

2. That our Churches be urged as far as possible to make monthly remittances to the Benevolent Causes.

3. That those churches which did not find it practicable to make the Every Member Canvass on the day appointed by the Assembly, be urged to make it on as early date possible.

Rev. C. W. Robinson made the report of the Executive Committee on Foreign Missions. Pending the adoption of the report Presbytery had the pleasure of hearing the Rev. R. E. McAlpine, D. D., a veteran missionary from Japan. The adopted report follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Your Committee has endeavored through the year to keep in touch with the work of our church abroad—and while it has been a year of anxiety and struggle financially—under the blessings of God, it has been a year of spiritual advance.

Due to continued diminishing receipts for the support of this work, the General Assembly, last May, authorized a spending budget of only \$784,000.00 for the year 1932-33. This was \$134,000.00 less than the actual expenditures of the previous year.

Ordinarily, the Executive Committee receives about 30 per cent of the total receipts during the month of March, the last month of the church year. The Bank holiday coming at this most vital time and cutting off all incomes for a period of weeks has brought about a desperate situation. Let us hope for the best. The time of closing the books was extended from March 28th to April 7th.

In reducing the cost of the work to meet the successive cuts, every effort has been made to keep the whole work intact—by scaling the amounts appropriated to every item of the work, rather than discontinue any part of it. This of course compels all our institutions to operate on an entirely inadequate basis of support.

For reasons of rigid economy—the committee has sent out only two new missionaries—Miss Margaret Wilson to our East Brazil Mission and Miss Ruth Worth to China for important work as a Technician for our hospitals. The other four missionaries were returned to their former fields.

In addition to the hard, disagreeable task burdening the hearts of our consecrated Executive Committee in cutting appropriations to those on the field. They have had the heart-breaking duty of declining to accept many applicants for work in the Foreign Field—saying to young men and women of the finest standard of character and qualifications; eager to devote life and service to the work abroad—“We cannot send you, we have no means.” This is one of the most serious features of the present situation.

God calls—the young people answer, the Master says “Go”—but the Church says: Well, your Committee leaves the answer to the Church.

Your Committee cannot let this opportunity slip without paying a tribute to the fine morale and loyal faithfulness of our missionaries. The full story cannot be told of what they have endured. Much of it has been borne in secret with that silent patience and courage that seeks compensation only from God.

Their ranks have been reduced by 407 workers, thus throwing added burdens upon those who are left—resulting in an unusual number of break-downs because of over-work, reduction of salaries, requiring economy in food, fuel, servants, etc.; These and other causes have put our missionaries under a strain almost beyond the power of human endurance, but we hear no complaint.

We turn now to the brighter side of the picture.

Never was there a year when the missionary dollar was more productive of results than during the year just closed—and the future is still brighter with prospects.

Reports from our six Foreign Fields emphasize the evidences of spiritual growth and development among our native churches. Frequent mention is made of the steady faith of the native Christians, a greater dependence upon prayer, growing activity in personal work and evangelism, of noble giving and Christian living.

The evidence of self-giving to God is manifest in the growing progress toward self-support—a willingness to sacrifice, a deeper love for the Saviour and His work and a recognition of God's ownership and of man's Stewardship of what is in his possession.

Without giving details for each field—we deem it sufficient to give the summary of the work in all the missions.

Never before has Foreign Missions yielded such rich returns for the amount invested. The future is still brighter. Doors are open, hearts are hungry, native Christians are more active in personal evangelism. Churches are being established, missionaries are laboring up to the limit of strength and God is calling us to go forward.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Presbytery acknowledge to the Great Head of the church our thanks for the manifest tokens of His blessings upon our Foreign work and earnest intercession for His continuous favor and guidance.

2. We urge pastors to keep the command of the Master and the claims of these distant lands ever before their people—emphasizing the need for earnest prayer in their behalf, and the duty of loyal support of our Foreign work.

3. That pastors and churches follow the General Assembly's change of schedule, observe October 8 to November 19 as the season for "Foreign Mission study",

and November 12-19 as the week of "Prayer and Self Denial" for Foreign Missions. That these seasons be set apart for special devotion and consecration, and a special offering be taken at this time for Foreign Missions.

4. We, the more earnestly urge this since there is skepticism in some quarters, as to the lost condition and estate of non-Christian people. We recommend that Presbytery enjoin all pastors to proclaim unhesitatingly the lost condition of men without faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as Saviour "For there is none other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved".

5. That churches, societies and individuals assume wherever practical, definite responsibility for definite parts of the Foreign work.

The Commission appointed to organize a Church at Laurel Fork made the following report, which was adopted.

REPORT OF COMMISSION TO ORGANIZE CHURCH AT LAUREL FORK

The Commission appointed by Presbytery to organize the Church at Laurel Forks, submits the following report:

The following members of the Commission met at Laurel Fork Sunday afternoon Sept. 25th. 1932, Rev.s C. W. Robinson, D. F. Helm and J. W. McFall, Chairman; Elders Geo. W. Bowlin, J. C. Crawford and Jesse Baker.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. J. W. McFall, who preached the sermon "Christ and His Church". The petitioners were asked to come forward and Rev. C. W. Robinson proceeded to question them. Mr. Robinson then officially pronounced the organization of the Laurel Fork Presbyterian Church. Hiram Woodie was elected, ordained and installed as elder. Ola Long was elected, ordained and installed as deacon.

The Commission was dismissed with prayer by Rev. D. F. Helm.

The Committee on Woman's Work made the following report, which, upon motion, was adopted:

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK

The Women of our Presbytery are keeping up their fine aggressive work, in which they have made an enviable record, with unremitting zeal. Twenty Auxiliaries report total contributions to all causes of \$9380.00 as compared to \$14,503.00 last year—a splendid record in spite of a decrease of more than one third. Your committee feels, however, that a few strong Auxiliaries have given more than their proportionate share of this amount.

Forty-eight prayer groups and twenty-five mission study classes were reported—again, we find the stronger Auxiliaries, and a few of the weaker ones, making splendid reports and others no report at all. Other inspiring statistics might be given if a few Auxiliaries had made accurate reports and given specific answers to specific questions.

IT IS RECOMMENDED

1. That our prayer of thanksgiving be offered to God for the fruitful work of these faithful women and our constant intercession be made for the presence, wisdom, and power of His Spirit in all their activities.

2. That our pastors earnestly enlist the cooperation of this "strong arm of our Church" in promoting a year of unprecedented Evangelistic endeavor in our Church.

3. That pastors of all Churches in which there are no Auxiliaries confer with our Presbyterial leaders with reference to aid in organizing and promoting Auxiliary work in such Churches. Should any pastor fail to do this, we recommend that the initiative be taken by the Presbyterial officers.

4. That our felicitations, together with a copy of this report, be forwarded to our Presbyterial which meets in Lexington, N. C. next week.

The Committee on Assembly's Home Missions made the report printed below, which was adopted:

REPORT ON ASSEMBLY'S HOME MISSIONS

The past year in Home Missions has been one of anxiety and difficulty; yet it has been a year of achievement and progress. Some phases of Assembly's Home Missions are found in fifty-nine Presbyteries and each of the seventeen Synods. In these fifty-nine Presbyteries receiving aid from the Assembly's Committee there were 535 workers who served 530 churches and missions and carried the gospel to 294 outpost Sunday Schools and unorganized preaching points. These Presbyteries report the organization of seven new churches and thirty-five new Sunday Schools and that eight Home Mission churches had assumed self-support.

The reports from the fields served by Assembly's Home Missions in every instance reflect the serious economic situation which has existed throughout the country. The general business depression has borne with exceptional gravity upon the Home Missionary who as a rule serves a people already poor and in many ways handicapped. Unemployment has been tragically intensified among the Negroes and Mexicans and other people among whom the Committee works. Many Home Mission churches and groups have been unable to pay their pastors the small amount promised. More than one Home Mission church has found itself with every member unemployed. The record of the year's work in Home Missions is a record of heroic struggle in which missionaries and churches have been compelled to carry unusual burdens with diminishing resources.

In keeping with all the agencies of our Church, the Home Mission Committee has been handicapped by distressing shortages of funds. After twenty years of enlarging receipts and expanding work, Assembly's Home Mission income has decreased to a point undreamed of five years ago. The budget receipts for the year ending March 31 were \$289,323.00, a decrease of \$99,514.00 from the income of 1932, making necessary a reduction of this amount in the appropriations for the current year.

Never in the history of the republic was there greater need for the undergirding and stabilizing work of the Christian Church and never was the abandonment of our aggressive Home Mission work fraught with greater peril. If there is danger of violent and revolutionary changes in the United States, as some thoughtful persons believe, it is not too much to say that Home Missions is the most important single enterprise of the Church. Revolutions will not come from conservative Presbyterian communities but from people who live on the margins and fringes of our economic life who have not been taught of God and know nothing of the saving power of Christ. It is here that the Church has its opportunity and Home Missions has its work. The primary need of our nation is a spiritual regeneration.

The following recommendations are presented for adoption by the Presbytery:

1. That all of our churches be called to a recognition of the primary place of Home Missions in the growth

of the church and welfare of our country in these critical times when the very foundations are being tested.

2. That all of our churches be urged to recognize their definite responsibility for the support of the particular Home Missions tasks assigned the Assembly's Committee.

3. That all pastors and sessions be urged to present this vital cause to their congregations in the periods assigned Assembly's Home Missions in the Church's schedule of activities and ask for a generous over and above offering in this time of pressing financial need.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINUTES OF SYNOD

The Committee on Minutes of Synod examined the Minutes of the Synod of North Carolina for the year 1932 and found the following recommendations:

1. That all our Presbyteries and Churches be most earnestly urged to lay special emphasis on the observance of Rally Day and to carefully plan for a liberal offering on that day for the cause of Religious Education. Attention is called to the action of the last Assembly in increasing the quota of Religious Education and Publication from three and one half percent to four and one half percent in order to meet the enlarged responsibility laid upon it.

2. That recognizing with sincere appreciation the excellent service rendered by the students of the Assembly's Training School for Lay Workers this past summer, the Presbyteries be encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity next summer if it is again presented.

3. In view of the action of the 1932 General Assembly, Synod urges the Presbyteries to use extreme care and prayerful diligence in the reception of young men as candidates for the ministry.

4. That as often as opportunity affords, the Foreign Mission Chairman of Presbytery arrange with the Foreign Mission office for missionary itineraries among all the churches within their bounds especially as there will be no study course for Foreign Missions in January under the new plan of Education.

Rev. C. W. Robinson, Dr. J. S. Foster and Rev. R. H. Stone made several appropriate remarks concerning the work and growth of Presbytery in the past ten years.

It was stated that the thirty-two churches of ten years ago had become forty churches; that the ministers have increased from nineteen to twenty-four with five candidates for the ministry; an increase in Auxiliaries from twelve to twenty-two; the Sunday Schools have grown from twenty to thirty-four and their membership from 2900 to 4788; the communicants numbering 3321 now number 4272 with a number of the original number retired to a separate roll. During ten years 2240 have been added to churches upon their profession of faith. There has likewise

been a marked improvement in the physical equipment—eleven churches have been built or are in process of construction; three new manses have been built; the Reynolda and Winston-Salem First Church have had wonderful Sunday School buildings added. Other churches have been remodeled and Sunday School plants added or enlarged.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was read and adopted:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

Your Committee had a part in arranging for the mid-winter meeting of Presbytery at Yadkinville in which evangelism was stressed at the morning session.

The Committee has secured a number of ministers who have volunteered to hold evangelistic services. We will be glad to cooperate with any pastor or congregation in securing an acceptable evangelist. Where churches have no pastor we will attempt to arrange for an evangelistic service during the year.

We urge the ministers to frequently lead their people in prayer for this year of Evangelism, to urge them to pray for the cause and to seek to use more of them in personal evangelism.

Communications

The Stated Clerk presented the following communications which were disposed of as indicated:

1. From Dr. J. D. Leslie, Stated Clerk of the Assembly, regarding the Amendment to the Book of Church Order, Paragraphs 103 and 104. This was answered in the affirmative.

2. A communication from Dr. Wm. Crowe, Chairman of the Ad Interim Committee on Federal Council was read and received as information.

3. From Rev. C. M. Gibbs, Stated Clerk of the Synod, a communication was read relative to the entertainment of Synod. This, too, was received as information.

4. A letter from Rev. J. T. Wildman was referred to the Home Mission Committee.

5. A letter from Mrs. T. H. Ferguson of the Sandy Ridge Church was also referred to the Home Mission Committee.

Rev. W. T. Baker was given an hour for the presentation of the cause of Religious Education. He introduced Miss Atha Bowman, from the Children's Division of the Presbyterian Committee of Publication, who spoke about the work of her department.

Mr. Baker read the following report, which was adopted:

Goals for the Committee of Religious Education Winston-Salem Prebytery October 1933 to March 31, 1934

Leadership Training

1. That an effort be made to get teachers accredited for general and specialization courses.
2. That where it is not possible for a church to put on an individual Leadership Training School they group with other churches in nearby communities and have a 1-2 or 3 unit school.
3. Hold three Sunday School Institutes in the three groups

Young People's Work

1. That the Presbytery's League function thru the seven departments of the Presbyterian Progressive Program.
2. That the Presbyterian League hold a Spring week-end Conference.
3. Every Church using Kingdom Highways—The Young People's Program.
4. Make some tentative plans for an Intermediate Conference to be held at Glade Valley.

Children's Work

1. Present it before Presbytery, and at Sunday School Institutes.
2. Make early preparations for Vacation Bible Schools for next Summer, to be held all over Presbytery.

Organization and Extension

1. That each church adopt the plan of the Committee of Religious Education called "The Church Council" which takes the place of the old Committee on Religious Education of the session.
2. That as many new Sunday Schools be organized and conducted as outpost mission schools as possible by each church.
3. That Presbytery be divided into three groups for the better presentation of the different phases of Religious Education. These groups to be as follows:

Group 1. Comprised of Forsyth, Davidson, Davie and Yadkin Counties, 13 churches.

Group 2. Comprised of Stokes and Surry Counties, 11 churches.

Group 3. Comprised of Ashe, Alleghany, and Wilkes Counties, 18 churches.

Men of the Church

1. That every church have an organization of the Men of the Church using the monthly program material on the various phases of the program for that month.

2. That where it is not possible for a church to have such an organization that it group with nearby churches and form an organization.

Country Church Work

1. Aim to get every town and country church to secure and use the wall chart of the "Standard for Village and Country Churches."

2. Get all the small rural churches to use the methods and helps suggested by the Department of Country Church Work with reference to self support.

3. Promote the "Countryside Library" the "Broadcastings" and other literature.

4. Interest and aid the small churches in adapting our whole Church Program to their needs and activities.

Recommendation of the Committee on Religious Education of Winston- Salem Presbytery

Glade Valley, N. C.
September 12th, 1933.

1. The adoption of the goals for the next six months.

2. That we hold a one day conference in each of the three groups of Presbytery this Fall on the different phases of religious education, these conferences to be held in co-operation with Orange Presbytery, the time and places to be announced later.

3. That we hold a one day Sunday School Institute in each of the three groups in the early Spring, time and places to be selected later.

4. That each church re-organize its session's Committee of Religious Education in accordance with the plan, suggested by the Executive Committee of Religious Education, Richmond, Va., known as "The Church Council."

5. That each Sunday School, observe Rally Day and take up an offering for Sunday School Extension.

6. That each Church send in the additional 1% that the General Assembly granted the Executive Committee of Religious Education, when it combined Men's Work and County Church Work under the Executive Committee on Religious Education.

Presbytery gave Miss Bowman, a rising vote of thanks and appreciation.

Presbytery took recess for five minutes. The Moderator called the Presbytery to order. Recognition was taken of the presence of the President of the Winston-Salem Presbyterial—Mrs. J. M. Wells, Jr.

The order of the day being determined for 3:00 P. M. Rev. C. W. Robinson read the Report of the Foreign Mission Committee, which follows:

Foreign Missions

The latest news from our Executive Committee of Foreign Missions—is to the effect that God has graciously blessed the work of our missionaries in every field. The missionaries report a wide spread interest in, and open heartedness toward the Gospel is evident in all our mission fields at this time, and accessions on profession of faith are abundant and gratifying.

These facts should call forth our profound gratitude to the Great Head of the Church—and at the same time fill us, of the home church, with deep humiliation as we think of the meager financial support we give to the work. We seem to have allowed ourselves to become so absorbed in local problems as to lose our vision of world needs.

A glance at the figures will emphasize this, by showing how we have been slipping back in our gifts to the work.

In 1929-30 our budget was.....	\$1,219.25
In 1930-31 our budget was.....	1,182.752
In 1931-32 our budget was.....	918.448
In 1932-33 our budget was.....	665.063
In 1933-34 our budget was.....	608.920

Just half of what it was in 1929. Is the financial depression sufficient account for this drop in our gifts? I think not.

And what should give us great concern, is that the downward trend of receipts still continue. The contributions for the first five months of this church year is \$67,981.80 short of the amount given during the same period last year.

Another alarming fact in this connection, is the decreased value of the American Dollar abroad.

Last year one American Dollar was worth almost five Japanese yen. Today one American Dollar is worth 3.67 yen.

Last year one Dollar was worth five Chinese Dollars; today it will bring only 3.48 Chinese Dollars.

Last year our Dollar was worth 36 Belgian Franca—today only 28.

It should be borne in mind that, in addition to all the cuts in appropriation made to our missionaries, there has been drastic reduction caused by the shrinkage in the purchasing power of the American Dollar. Is it not imperative that this shrinkage be offset by larger contributions at this end of the work, if we expect to keep our missionaries in the field?

What would our Lord have to say about this matter? He gave His life for the cause.

Missionaries and native workers have borne the pinch of these lean years with fortitude—but is it not our moral duty to relieve them at the earliest possible moment—we authorized them to go and promised adequate support.

The world never needed the Gospel more than now.

Hearts are hungry for Christ

Business revival and returning prosperity at home, call us to advance.

God's blessings upon the work calls us to advance. Whatever else fails the Kingdom must go forward.

The crucified but loving Christ calls to us "Go".

Recommendations

1. We earnestly recommend that Presbytery urge our churches to observe the period from Oct. 8 to Nov. 19 as the special occasion for Foreign Mission study and promotion, using the approved text book, "The Ambassador Supreme", by Edward Grant. It is interesting and most instructive.

2. The period from Nov. 12-19 as a special season of prayer and self-denial for Foreign Missions—calling our people to a re-dedication of life and means to the supreme mission of taking the world for Christ.

During this period let much time, thought and prayer be given to our Sunday Schools and young people societies—encouraging them to take an active part in this great adventure.

Prohibition Forum

Rev. J. K. Fleming made an address and conducted a forum with reference to Prohibition. Drs. J. S. Foster and J. R. McGregor and Rev. C. W. Robinson denounced liquor in unequivocal terms. Mr. Robinson requested a number to lead prayers for a higher morality for our nation.

Mr. Ernest Milton, of the Presbyterian Orphans' Home was recognized by Presbytery.

The report of the Stewardship Committee was read by the Chairman, Rev. J. K. Fleming and was adopted:

Report of the Stewardship Committee

Your Committee submits this report with a feeling of gratitude to God for His continued blessings upon the work of our whole Church. We would hereby call your attention to two paragraphs in the last report of the Assembly's Stewardship Committee. On page 52 Minutes of the Assembly is this paragraph—"That we express our approval of the splendid reports placed in our hands, and call the especial attention of the Assembly to the note of joy running through them because of the spiritual progress of the work and the remarkable fine response of the Church in supporting the work during these trying times". On page 51 Minutes of the Assembly is the following paragraph—"The Committee is indeed gratified that in the difficulties and perplexities facing all of our Assembly agencies we find our Secretaries and all those in positions of responsibility working together in the finest spirit of cooperation and united in the closest bonds of fellowship." This fine spirit of devotion to God and the whole work of His Kingdom is also manifest throughout the Committees and Churches of our Presbytery. With such evidence of the Spirit's guidance and blessing, we should be encouraged to look with renewed hope for still greater things in the Master's work.

The following recommendations are offered:

1. That every Church in the Presbytery be urged to make an Every Member Canvass for Local Church Expenses and Benevolences for the Year 1934-35.

2. That the date for the Every Member Canvass be March 4, 1934, the first Sunday in March, so as to avoid as far as possible any conflict with the pay up period.

3. That Presbytery adopt and hand down to the Churches the following system of percentages for Benevolent Causes:

7. That in connection with the 1934 Every Member Canvass, an active campaign for tithers or proportionate givers be lauched in every congregation in the Presbytery as one of the essential factors in any local program to revitalize the spirituality of the local Church membership.

8. That prior to the Every Member Canvass an adjourned meeting of Presbytery be held at Yadkinville; that fixing the date for this meeting be left to the Secretary of Stewardship and the Stated Clerk; and that the Secretary of Stewardship be authorized to arrange an appropriate program for the occassion.

9. That Presbytery urge Church Sessions and Boards of Deacons to see to it that a dual treasury system is established in every congregation.

10. That Sessions and Diaconates be charged to guard scrupulously and to keep separate from all other funds the Benevolent moneys which come into their hands.

11. That the Presbyterian Assessment of the Winston-Salem First Church be reduced from \$500.00 to \$400.00.

Presbytery took recess to meet at 7:30 P. M. in the auditorium of the Glade Valley School. Dr. McAlpine led the prayer before adjournment.

Evening Session

Presbytery was called to order at 7:30 P. M. by the Moderator in the auditorium of the Glade Valley School. After a hymn the Moderator led the opening prayer.

A popular meeting in the interest of Presbytery's Home Missions was held with Dr. J. R. McGregor in charge. A devotional talk was made by Rev. R.H. Stone. The Glade Valley School choir sang a special musical number.

The following report was read by Dr. McGregor:

Report of Home Mission Committee

Your Committee believes that we have had one of our finest Summers work. From all parts of our Presbytery there come reports to us of the Spirit's special blessing and power upon all efforts to make Christ and His claims for life known to men and women, boys and girls. All workers have shown a beautiful sacrificial spirit that moves us, and people's of their several fields to take note of their likeness to our Saviour. Our Presbytery is indebted to and deeply grateful to all of these who are giving themselves so freely and fully to their privileges and tasks.

There were conducted in our Home Mission Churches 23 Daily Vacation Bible Schools with an enrollment of approximately 2,100, to be taught by 74 volunteer teachers and workers. We can never estimate the power in this for presenting the truth which makes devout Christians. We also have had 27 Evangelistic Campaigns conducted by our pastors with the assistance of 22 ministers outside their own fields. In these services 286 people accepted Christ as their personal Saviour. There were added to our Churches 206 people by profession of their faith, and 67 by letter or statement of their membership. We do not believe any Presbytery of our Synod will surpass this fine result.

Your committee has been distressed every month with its inability to meet the salaries due. We are now three months in arrears. This condition calls us to fervent prayer. We urgently request that every minister and every Church make sacrificial effort to pay this obligation.

We recommend that a commission be appointed to study the condition of the Elkin Church, and make recommendations at the next meeting of Presbytery.

Until such time as our organization is granted we wish to place our membership in the Low Gap Presbyterian Church and request Rev. D. F. Helm to minister to our community.

A commission composed of Révs. R. H. Stone, Chairman, J. W. Luke, D. F. Helm, C. W. Robinson and W. I. Howell, Jr., and Elders H. M. Darnell, J. C. Crawford, E. G. Finley, E. A. McNeill and George Farrington was appointed to investigate the need, confer with the people and take such action as it deems wise and report to the Spring Meeting of Presbytery. In the meantime Rev. D. F. Helm is requested to continue to minister to the community until the church be organized.

A popular meeting for the Barium Springs Orphanage was held. The report was read by Rev. C. E. Clarke and was adopted:

Report of the Presbyterian Orphans' Home to Winston-Salem Presbytery

August 26th, 1933

The work at Barium Springs is still in a period of transition and re-adjustment. These re-adjustments brought about by the changed financial conditions in our church.

The contributions from the church showed a marked decline in the last few years, that our benevolent budget is now revised by 25 per cent. Our askings from benevolent sources this year was \$81,000.00 instead of \$106,000.00.

There was a similar reduction in the income from other sources, so that our support fund has been reduced by more than 25 per cent.

In order to meet this changed condition, we have reduced the number of children from 360 to 301, at the present time. We have reduced the staff from 35 to 26. We have placed the school entirely under State control and supervision, and are not now supplementing any teachers' salaries, nor have additional teachers nor extending the term. We will this year operate for eight months, just as the other State schools have done.

This has caused changes in our school which we regret exceedingly. The set-up now makes it practically impossible for any child to make up for lost time, and since so many of the children who enter the Orphanage are from one to five years retarded in school work, it means that the amount of advancement for these children is materially lessened during their stay at Barium. The Orphanage still retains its lead among the Orphanages of North Carolina and South Carolina, according to the standards used by the Duke Endowment, but this year, we share this lead with one other institution, and one other institution is within one point of us.

A year ago, we were 41 points ahead of our nearest competitor;

this year nine of them have advanced closer than that, and we have made no advance.

We are penalized more on the condition of our buildings than for any one thing, and we regret to say that we have been unable to keep up the necessary repairs to keep our buildings in a condition that would warrant a higher rating in this particular

We have reduced our per capita cost approximately ten cents per day per child.

Naturally, in trying to hold down our population, we have had to be more than ever careful to receive into the institution only children that would be entirely without help, except for us. We have had to refuse numbers of applicants, and we may have offended the people interested in these applications, but we are faced with the necessity of cutting down the number served, or else run hopelessly in debt.

In our present set-up we are living within our income, but are making very little headway in reducing the debt accumulated during the last few years when the revenue dropped off so sharply.

As to Winston-Salem, we are always delighted to report Winston-Salem as the leading Presbytery in the matter of gifts. We may possibly have given too much publicity to this thing, but any Presbytery that exceeds the minimum asked for, we believe, deserves mention.

In spite of this fact, in the language of Revelations, "We have somewhat against Thee" Winston-Salem. The splendid showing made by the Presbytery. There are several wealthy and generous churches that give liberally, and there are a few individuals that are able and generous, and the Presbytery as a whole, profits by this giving of a few; and if these gifts were deleted from the report, of the Presbytery, we fear that the general run of contributions in Winston-Salem Presbytery would not be ahead of some of our less publicized communities.

One other feature. While Winston-Salem Presbytery is giving liberally, as a whole, in money, she is also giving most liberally in children, and we have at the present time, more children from Winston-Salem Presbytery (based on membership of the church) than from any Presbytery in the Synod. In fact, the number is double the average of the entire Synod.

At the present time, we have one child here for each 261 members of the church, taking the Synod as a whole. A few years ago, we had one child for each 200 members of the Synod. At the present time, we have from Winston-Salem one child for each 112 church members.

This is something more than double the average for the Synod, and this high average is not closely approached by any other Presbytery. The nearest being Albemarle, with one child to each 153 church members.

We would like to urge upon Winston-Salem Presbytery a matter that we have taken up over the entire State. And that is, not to urge necessarily more giving on those already contributing, but to make the contributions to the Orphanage more general.

Anyone can divide the benevolent budget of the Orphanage into the total membership of the church, and find that it takes a very small per capita contribution to keep the Orphanage going. Just TEN CENTS PER MEMBER PER MONTH, or \$1.20 per member per year.

Our endeavor this year has been to communicate with every church that is giving less than this, and ask that a sincere effort be made within that church, to at least reach this minimum. This \$1.20 per member per year includes all giving. Whether from the regular church budget, from the Sunday School collection, Thanksgiving offering, and all other gifts.

We believe that if the churches in Winston-Salem Presbytery that are not already within the group, that gives this much, that if they will make a sincere endeavor that they can easily reach this goal, and it is this that we most earnestly ask of you.

Remember that while Winston-Salem Presbytery leads in giving per church member, they would be far from the top if their giving was divided by the number of children here. There are at present 38 children from Winston-Salem Presbytery, with three more to enter before school starts.

The Trustees of Glade Valley School gave the report which follows and was adopted:

Report of the Trustees of the Glade Valley School

BRETHREN:

During these years of stress and strain and uncertainty it is our good pleasure to send you a good report for the year 1932-33 of your Glade Valley School.

At the meeting of the Board of Trustees held in Winston-Salem on June 2, 1933 Rev. S. M. Rankin, Chairman of the Finance Committee, made his report for the year. In some cases he is having to take the attitude of watchful waiting as to the loans. He has collected \$463.06 interest and \$1,250.00 on the principal of the loans.

A new fund has been established known as the Sadie Sloan Watt Fund of \$650.00. This amount was willed to the Trustees of Orange Presbytery for building and maintaining a school or schools for mountain boys and girls. At the suggestion of Mr. Rankin the Presbytery authorized its Trustees to turn this over to the Trustees of the Glade Valley School to be used in the school's support.

The face value of our endowed interests is \$18,000.00.

Mr. E. B. Eldridge reported receipts from all sources as \$7,262.86. Of this amount the students paid in cash or produce, wood, etc. \$2,917.56. Outstanding accounts amount to \$870.00. The total disbursements amount to \$7,252.55—leaving a balance of \$10.31. The unpaid bills and salaries total \$965.00. Against this the collectable accounts apply.

As compared with last year the disbursements were \$2,871.58 less.

The farm yielded a large amount of produce. Six hogs were killed and the dairy supplied milk for the tables.

The school last year was one of the best. There was a fine spirit and a full enrollment. There was an exceptionally fine Christian atmosphere. All of the students but two became Christians before leaving this Spring. Nineteen during the year united with the Presbyterian Church.

Our faculty this year (1933-34) as last, has agreed to receive what comes in for salaries. Hence at the end of the year there will be no indebtedness.

The school is in good condition financially. It is our conviction that it is fulfilling well the purpose of its founders in giving a Christian education to the boys and girls of the mountains. We covet the prayers of your constituency for the activities of the coming year.

Session of 1932-33 Workers only received five months pay of eight months service, which amounted to \$1,325.00 free service. Thereby a deficit was avoided.

During the year all but two of the 28 non Christians accepted Christ as their Savior and 11 united with the Presbyterian Church; two of these from Presbyterian homes and nine from Baptist homes.

1932-33: Enrolled from Presbyterian Homes 46; Members of Church 39; Non Members 7; Enrolled from Baptist Homes 20; Members of Church 2; Non Members 18. Enrolled from Methodist Homes 4; Members of Church 3; Non Members 3. Enrolled from Brethren Home 1; Members of Church 1. Totals: 71 students, 45 of which are Members of a Church, and 28 Non Members.

During the year all but two of the 25 non Christian accepted Christ and 19 united with the Presbyterian Church; seven of these from Presbyterian homes and 12 from Baptist homes. Two from the Methodist Church united with P. Ch. by letter. Leaving only seven of student body nonmembers. With these additions, fraction over 90% of students are Presbyterians.

These coming into the Church are proving themselves loyal to the Presbyterian Churches; Several have and are helping in the Vacation Bible Schools in Ashe, Wilkes, Alleghany and other counties. Others are teaching Sunday School Classes and conducting young people's Societies.

The school has trained five Ministers and has one Ministerial student and one graduate in Assembly's Training School. Five graduates doing Home Mission Work; Others taking Religious Influence into Hospitals, Drs. Offices, Homes and most every walk of life.

Rev. Chas. E. Clarke extended a most cordial welcome to the Presbytery. Upon motion of Rev. W. T. Baker there was a period of silent prayer in memory of the late Rev. George W. Lee in whose memory the host church is named. This was concluded with a prayer by the Moderator.

Communications

The following communications were read and disposed of as follows:

1. From Dr. W. M. McPheeters in regard to the "So-called Investigation of the Rumors Abroad Concerning the Soundness in the Faith of Rev. Dr. Hay Watson Smith". This was received as information.

2. From the Lansing Presbyterian Church requesting transfer of their Church property from the Trustees of the Presbytery to their duly elected trustees. Presbytery instructed the Trustees of Presbytery to convey this property as requested.

3. From Dr. E. B. Paisley, President of the Assembly's Training School for Lay Workers. This was referred to a Committee on Schools and Colleges.

4. From Mr. E. L. Anderson, being an appeal taken from the congregational meeting held in the First Presbyterian Church, Winston-Salem, N. C., January 21, 1934, adjourned to meet January 28th 1934. Mr. Anderson was contesting the action of the congregation as it operated under the plan of Rotary Officers. The appeal was read and also a copy of a letter from James O. Spear, Clerk of the Session, acknowledging receipt of copy of appeal being filed with the Presbytery.

Dr. John S. Foster raised the following point of order against the reception of the paper presented by the Appellant—Mr. E. L. Anderson:

To the Presbytery of Winston-Salem:

I raise a point of order against the reception of the paper presented by Mr. E. L. Anderson as an appeal to Presbytery from an action of a congregational meeting held in the First Presbyterian Church of Winston-Salem on January 21st., 1934 and adjourned to meet January 27th, 1934 for the following reason:

An appeal is not the proper method of procedure in regard to redressing wrongs that constitute the burden of his complaint. Chapter 13, Paragraph 259, Rules of Discipline state "The acts and decisions of a lower court are brought under the supervision of a higher court in one or another of the following modes: (1) Review and Control: (2) Reference: (3) Appeal (4) Complaint".

In specifying these four modes of procedure and in clearly defining their scope in succeeding paragraphs the Book of Church Order emphatically implies that they are not to be confused or mis-used in their intent and employment.

In his proposed appeal the appellant says "This appeal is made on the authority given Chapter 16, Page 135, Book of Church Order, Rules of Discipline."

Chapter 16, Paragraph 273, Rules of Discipline—the chapter to which he goes for the authority of his appeal says "An appeal

is the transfer to a higher court of a judicial case on which judgment has been rendered in a lower court, and is allowable only to the party against whom the decision has been rendered”.

Chapter 16, Paragraph 274, Rules of Discipline says “Only those who have submitted to a regular trial are entitled to an appeal. Those who have not submitted to a regular trial are not entitled to an appeal.”

The point of order is made that the appellant has not been charged with an offense and has not therefore been subjected to a judicial trial and having had no judgment rendered against him cannot enter an ecclesiastical appeal in the matter about which he complains.

In the conviction that the actions of the congregational meetings of the First Presbyterian Church of Winston-Salem held May 28th, 1933, and January 21st, and January 28th, 1934 were legal and in order, and in the further belief that the Book of Church Order provides the proper steps for one to pursue who may question their constitutional character, and in the further belief that the proper method of procedure will best promote the interests of all concerned, and with a perfect willingness to meet any issue arising therefrom when properly presented, I raise the point of order that the appeal as submitted by the appellant is out of harmony with the constitutional law of the Church and cannot be accepted as in order by the Presbytery.

The resignation of Rev. C. W. Ervin from Presbytery's Home Mission Committee was presented and accepted by the Presbytery. Because of his work in the Glade Valley School he was excused from attendance of Presbytery during this session.

Rev. W. T. Baker, Chairman of Presbytery's Committee on Religious Education, made the following report:

Total Tabulation of Presbytery's Committee of Religious Education

Total Enrollment of Sunday Schools, 3818; 33 Schools; Pupils added to Church, 236; Benevolent Contributions, \$4,182; Young People's Contributions, \$290; Number of New Out Post Sunday Schools, 4; Number of Vacation Bible Schools, 28; Number of Men of Church Organizations, 6; Number of L. T. S. held, 6; Number of Y. P. of Church Organizations, 17; Number of One Day Group Conferences, 3—Jefferson, Winston-Salem, Asbury; Number in attendance, 307.

Following this Mr. Baker introduced Dr. J. E. Purcell, who spoke on the subject of Adult Christian Education. Mr. Baker then offered the following recommendations, which, with the report, were adopted:

The Work of Religious Education in Winston-Salem Presbytery

1st: That the Presbytery's Committee hold at least one meeting a year at which meeting sufficient time will be given to discuss the work of the Presbytery.

2nd: That the Synod's Director—when one is secured—be given an opportunity to meet with the Presbytery's Committee.

3rd: That one day Group Conferences be held in Spring and Fall in each district.

4th: That careful consideration be given to the filling of all vacancies on the Committee.

5th: That special study be given by the Presbytery's Committee as to how to finance the work in the Presbytery.

6th: Special effort be given to secure the cooperation of the Presbyterial.

The following is the program of work for the Presbytery:

I. LEADERSHIP TRAINING

(1) An effort be made to get teachers accredited for General and Specialization Courses.

(2) That Leadership Training schools and local training classes be held, provided the interest warrants it, in each church or group of churches.

II. YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

(1) That the Davidson Y. P. Conference be emphasized, and that the churches be requested to select their representatives.

(2) That the Presbytery's League function through the seven departments of Our Church Program.

(3) That the Young People of the Presbytery be brought together at least once during the year in a one day or week-end conference and that next fall we have three one-day Group Conferences for Young People.

(4) Every church carrying the Young People's Program-Kingdom Highways.

(5) If advisable, that an Intermediate Camp be held in the Presbytery.

III. CHILDREN'S WORK

(1) Graded Literature rightly used.

(2) Vacation schools in every church possible.

IV. MEN OF THE CHURCH

(1) That each church or group of churches have a Men of the Church organization.

V. COUNTRY CHURCH WORK

(1) That the Country Churches use the program as far as possible set up by Dr. McLaughlin, Director of Country Church Work.

VI. ORGANIZATION AND EXTENSION

(1) That a committee be appointed in each church to promote the work of Religious Education.

(2) That new schools be organized and conducted as outpost mission schools.

Recommendations

1. The adoption of the Program of Work for the Year.

2. That each Sunday School observe Rally Day and take up an offering for Sunday School Extension.

3. That each Church send in the percentage granted by the Assembly to the Executive Committee of Religious Education and Publication plus the 1 per cent granted when Men's Work and Country Church work were placed under this Committee.

4. That a committee be appointed in each Church to promote the Work of Religious Education.

The report of Presbytery's Committee on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief was made by the chairman, Rev. J. W. McFall, and follows:

Report on Christian Education and Ministerial Relief

Your committee on C. E. & M. R. begs to submit the following report:

We have five candidates for the ministry under the care of Presbytery.

O. W. Marshall, who is serving the Glade Valley group of Churches.

M. W. Norfleet Jr. who completes his third year at Union Seminary this May. Mr. Norfleet has been awarded the Charles D. Larus Fellowship for 1933 and will return to Union Seminary for postgraduate work this fall. He will work with Dr. S. M. Glasgow in Savannah, Ga. this summer.

Charles Weaver is a student at Duke University.

W. B. Gwyn is at home.

F. A. Watson is at the University of North Carolina.

We have two Ministerial widows who received aid from the Fund of Ministerial relief this past year.

During the past year the Church, Auxiliaries, Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies of Winston-Salem Presbytery contributed \$2,548.96 to C. E. & M. R. which was an increase of \$652 over last year.

Your committee recommends:

1st. That Winston-Salem Presbytery endorse the applications of Mrs. Bettie C. Mebane for Ministerial Relief to the amount of \$216.00 and Mrs. Lucy Morrow to the amount of \$144.00 for the year April 1, 1934-March 31, 1935.

2nd. That each Church send its proportionate part of benevolent Funds to C. E. & M. R.

3rd. That our Church exercise great care in receiving ministers from other denominations.

4th. That the ministers in our Presbytery who are indebted to the Fund for the education of Ministers, make diligent effort to pay their indebtedness.

5th. That candidate O. W. Marshall not be examined for licensure and ordination until he has had further scholastic work.

It was moved by Mr. McFall that the report and the first four recommendations be adopted. This was carried. He then made a motion that the fifth recommendation regarding the licensure of Mr. O. W. Marshall be adopted. Pending the putting of this motion a call from the Carson Memorial Presbyterian Church for the ministerial services of Mr. Marshall was read.

Also the communication from the Glade Valley congregation was read:

To the Winston-Salem Presbytery:

In a legally called congregational meeting of the Glade Valley Presbyterian Church the congregation voted to express their appreciation to the Presbytery for supplying the field with the

services of Mr. O. W. Marshall and desire that he be returned to the work, subject to the will and pleasure of the Presbytery.

Mr. Marshall was permitted to speak in his own behalf. There was quite a discussion as to this recommendation. By vote of the Presbytery the fifth recommendation was carried.

Rev. J. W. Luke made a motion, which was carried, that Presbytery's Committee of Christian Education and Ministerial Relief prepare an outline of studies to be pursued by Mr. Marshall.

Presbytery adjourned until 7:30 P. M.

Evening Session

According to adjournment Presbytery was reconvened. Mr. S. D. Gordon conducted the devotional service and preached the sermon preceding the Communion. He used for his text "The Master is here". Revs. J. K. Fleming and C. W. Robinson presided at the Communion table. They were assisted by Elders A. A. Finley, Victor Clark, J. H. Thompson, H. D. Monroe, E. B. Eldridge and A. C. Port.

The following Elders were enrolled: R. D. Watson of the Geo. W. Lee Memorial Church and L. R. Shadrick, of Waughtown.

Rev. C. W. Robinon presided over the Presbytery and presented the Foreign Mission report, which is as follows:

Report of Committee of Foreign Missions

It is with profound gratitude to God that we are to report the year just closed as the most spiritually fruitful in all our history of missions.

Letters from the various Fields abound with notes of praise for God's blessings upon the work; not only because of the largest ingathering of souls in our history, but for the open door, and evident interest on the part of those as yet outside of the Kingdom.

There was an addition of 8,383 to the Church membership—an increase of 8,058 in our Sabbath Schools, and a larger number of students in our day schools, and our Hospitals ministered to the largest number of patients ever treated in any one year of history. All this, notwithstanding, the loss of nine missionaries, and very drastic cuts in the support funds.

Evidence of growth and development of self-support is also encouraging. A number of churches have assumed full financial independence; and plans are on foot to transfer the Carrie McMillan Home to the Japan Presbyterian Church, at Kochi. Similar plans are now being worked out for the transfer of the Gammon Institute at Lavras to the Brazilian Presbyterian Church.

Our Executive Secretary C. Darby Fulton writes "The Spiritual tone of our work has been stirring. Never before have prayer and diligence and dependence upon God, characterized more

fully, either our Missionaries, or their native assistants in the work. One can assign no other reason for the unprecedented fruitfulness of the work, in its every phase, than the working of Divine Grace".

Financial

We do not like to mar this note of optimism by reference to the stringency of our financial problems. Within the space of four years the support of our work has been reduced to exactly half. That the work has "lived and gone forward" is an amazing evidence of God's leadership and blessing. This fact calls for daily praise and thanksgiving on the part of everyone who is interested in the work.

We must however remind you, though the most rigid economies have been put into force, physically speaking, the work is in a threadbare condition. Medical supplies do give out; houses for the missionaries to live in, and school buildings need repair. Missionaries and native workers have exhausted all their resources, and we are now face to face with the time, when the work, if it is to continue, must be more liberally supported; and this depends upon the love, consecration and self sacrifice of the Home Church.

Foreign Missions is the Lord's great cause and He is looking to us saying; "Inasmuch as ye did it to the least of these my Bretheren"—The Committee leaves you to fill out the Master's full speech.

The question is; Shall we "stand still", "Go back" or "Go forward"?

Can you not visualize the Master standing on the border line and with arms outstretched, pointing to both the Home and Foreign Fields, saying, "The harvests are ready for the sickle, the world is my parish. Go! Preach! Gather them in. My presence shall go with you. My blessings shall be upon you. I have touched the young life of the Church." They are ready to go. Will the Home Church send them?

Recommendations

1. That all the churches of the Presbytery be called to a renewal of the missionary advance, discounting past records; that we adopt as our goal the standard of loyalty and sacrificial devotion that the Lord Jesus would ask of His servants in such a time as this.

2. That in view of the fact, that there will be no special Foreign Missions study book during this church year, the Pastors be urged to remember the greater need of keeping their people informed of the necessity of supporting this cause, and asking them to give it a place in their private and family devotions.

3. That May 6th be observed as Foreign Mission Day in all our churches, with special offerings in the Sunday Schools for this cause.

By a rising vote of thanks Presbytery expressed to Dr. McAlpine its appreciation for his address. By a similar token its gratitude was tendered Mr. Gordon for his splendid "Quiet Talk".

Presbytery adjourned with prayer to meet at nine o'clock in the morning.

Wednesday Morning Session

Presbytery was opened at 9:00 A. M. with the devotional service being conducted by Rev. J. W. Foster. At 9:30 Dr. Howard Pondthaler, President of Salem College, was heard on Evangelism.

Dr. F. E. Gillespie, of Orange Presbytery, Superintendent of Synod's Home Missions, was introduced to the Presbytery and invited to sit as a visiting brother.

Dr. Gillespie and Mr. E. B. Eldridge introduced a proposition to sell a part of the Church lot in Sparta for \$1,000.00. Upon motion the Trustees of Presbytery were instructed to use their best judgment in this matter.

Rev. J. W. Luke made the report for the Commission to organize a Church at Miller's School, which was adopted and follows:

Organization of Presbyterian Church at Miller's School

The commission appointed by Presbytery met the petitioning members October 1st, at 2:30 p. m. at Miller's School. The commission consisted of the following Ministers and Elders. Ministers—Revs. C. W. Robinson, D. F. Helm, and J. W. Luke. Elders—J. R. Finley, and Geo. W. Bowlin.

The service proceeded as follows:

Hymn—"Take the Name of Jesus with You".

Prayer—Rev. C. W. Robinson.

Sermon—Rev. D. F. Helm (Text—Luke 22:31-32).

Testimonials showed that the petitioners had already been received and were ready to be organized.

Questions Propounded and Pledge given by members—Rev. C. W. Robinson.

The church officially pronounced to be organized by Rev. C. W. Robinson.

Election of Elders—The following were duly nominated and elected as Elders: Bud Dancy, Bryant Wyatt, Com Miller.

Election of Deacons—The following were duly nominated and elected as Deacons. Monroe Barlow, Fred Wyatt, Press Miller, and Monroe Royal.

The Elders and Deacons were duly ordained and installed as officers of the church, (the name of the church not being chosen yet).

After singing "Blest Be the Tie that Binds", the congregation was dismissed with the Benediction by Rev. C. W. Robinson.

Rev. R. H. Stone requested that the Commission to organize a Church at Big Ridge be continued. This request was granted.

Dr. J. R. McGregor, Chairman of Presbytery's Home Mission Committee, read the following report:

Report of Home Mission Committee

Your committee would express for Presbytery our profound gratitude for the Spirit's power upon the labors of our ministers and workers. The continued progress and growth of our work is evidence of our Lord's approval and great blessing. In this the ministers and young women have received their reward. We are deeply grateful to them for their Christ-like spirit of self-denial and sacrifice. Although we have failed them month by month with a supply of the needs of life they have never failed in giving themselves freely and fully.

There has been a zealous effort to attain the recommendations of the Presbytery for the year. There were conducted in our Home Mission Churches 28 Daily Vacation Bible Schools with an enrollment of approximately 2,200, with 78 volunteer teachers and workers. We have had also 29 evangelistic campaigns by our pastors assisted by 22 ministers outside their own fields. In these services 356 people accepted Christ as their Saviour. There were added to our Churches 264 people by profession of faith in Christ, and 70 by letter or statement of their membership in other Churches. We do not recall a year with such a great harvest ingathering.

There has been organized one Church, at Miller's School Community. Work has gone steadily forward in the completion of Church buildings begun.

You will remember that we asked our Presbyterial to assume the full support of Miss Virginia Hart, which they have done. She has continued to do a fine work for us in Stokes and Surry Counties. Miss Katherine O'Neal, without any support from our Committee, is continuing her excellent work in Ashe County. Rev. D. F. Helm has secured, without any aid from our Committee, Miss Kathryn Hunt, a graduate of The Assembly's Training School, to help in his field.

Rev. Mr. J. D. Smith has accepted again the supply of the Danbury Church, and Rev. Henry Willis of Madison continues to supply the Pine Hall Church, leaving one of that group without any regular preaching services. Mr. O. W. Marshall has supplied the Glade Valley group for the year. Rev. J. P. Taylor is supplying the Yadkinville Church, leaving two Churches of this group without regular preaching services. We regret that our lack of money force us to fail these fields.

It has been a source of distress to your committee that we have not been able to pay our ministers regularly, and are now indebted to them for one month's work. If Presbytery could advise with us as to how to remedy this we would be greatly relieved. We would urge every Church, from the smallest to the largest to send their gifts for this cause as regularly as possible.

We would recommend:

1. That every Church earnestly try to put into effect this year God's Aere Plan. This would, at least, help to provide provisions of food for the ministers.

2. That an evangelistic campaign be conducted in every Church.

3. That a Daily Vacation Bible School be conducted in every Church.

4. That the evangelistic Campaign and the Daily Vacation Bible School be conducted concurrently, is possible.

5. That our ministers continue their plan of finding and developing outmost Sunday Schools and preaching services, using the leaders of their stronger Churches.

6. That every Church release her pastor for at least one evangelistic campaign during the year.

J. RUPERT McGREGOR, Chairman.

The motion to adopt this report with its recommendations was carried.

There followed quite a discussion as to the inadequate support of the Home Mission pastors and workers. Dr. Gillespie suggested that there be an exchange of pulpits to present the facts to the various congregations. Upon motion this suggestion was adopted and is embodied in the report of the Home Mission Committee and becomes recommendation number 7.

Upon motion every member of the Presbytery having Home Missions news or facts of interest is requested to send them to Dr. E. E. Gillespie for use in his news sheet—Presbyterian News.

The matter of the sale of the Sparta Church property was again brought before the Presbytery. Upon motion the Trustees of the Presbytery were instructed to close the deal.

Report of Stewardship Committee

This report is submitted with a feeling of gratitude to Almighty God for His continued blessing upon the whole work of our Church. In spite of the continued reductions and deficits our people have gone forward in a remarkable way in the work, manifesting a beautiful spirit of sacrifice and devotion to the cause of Christ.

In the Assembly's work for the first eleven months there was an increase of gifts to only one of the causes, this being the amount of \$7,536 to the work of Christian Education and Ministerial Relief. The three other Executive Committees—Foreign Missions, Home Missions and Religious Education—show a decrease of gifts to the total amount of \$62,473.

The following information has been gathered with reference to the work of the Presbytery: six churches paid in full their quotas to Benevolent causes; sixteen churches accepted in full their Benevolent askings for next year; twenty-six churches made an E. M. C.; and nine churches paid pastor's salary in full.

Report of the Committee on Woman's Work

The Summary annual report of the Woman's Auxiliary of Winston-Salem Presbytery reveals the continued zeal and consecration and sense of stewardship that has been so manifest in other reports.

There are 1291 Auxiliary members enrolled in 22 Auxiliaries.

Thirteen circles contributed to all Denominational Benevolences. The Adult Education, of which the Presbytery has heard, has been emphasized in that 14 Auxiliaries observed the General Study season. Fifteen Auxiliaries observed the season of prayer and self-denial for both Home and Foreign Missions. There are 54 prayer groups, and 207 family altars. They were zealous in reading our denominational papers and magazines.

Their gifts to Denominational Benevolences were \$8,253.92. To Local Church work they gave \$1506.05. To miscellaneous causes \$184.47 was contributed. Their total gifts were \$9,944.44, which is a per capita gift of \$7.70.

Dear Mr. Clark:

I am herewith submitting a report on the Orphanage to Winston-Salem Presbytery:

Our financial condition at the present time is slightly better than it was a year ago, although our receipts for the year have been less. Our expenses have been reduced so that we end the year without a current deficit for the year.

The month of March is pay-up month, and our financial health in April is largely dependent on the success of March as a pay-up month. In 1933 it was not a success. The closing of the banks, following the President's inauguration, was a very disturbing factor in the contributions from the churches, and in getting those contributions to us after they had been collected. So that we started our church year in 1933, badly crippled. We have trimmed down very much in our expenses. At the present time, we are caring for eight less children than we were a year ago, and we are doing much less for the children that are here.

Since turning our school over to the State, the ten teachers allowed by the State set-up are attempting to do in eight months, what seventeen teachers formerly did in nine months.

This arrangement is satisfactory, as far as the bright, unretarded schoolchild is concerned, but when a child enters our school (that is in any way retarded) it is practically impossible to remedy that retardation, and the child will be prevented from graduating or making up any of that lost time. Also, when sickness occurs, it is next to impossible to make up for this lost time. For instance, we had 56 cases of measles after school started last September. This meant a loss of time on the part of these students, of from one week to four weeks. A great many of these have not been able to make up that lost time, and will fail of promotion this year. Now, a failure to promote is much more

serious to us than it is with the other State schools. The State schools are not responsible for the food, clothing and health of the children, and if a child fails of promotion, the State is just out about \$60.00—the cost of education for that child for that year; whereas, we have lost some \$260.00, being the total cost of the upkeep of that child for that length of time, to say nothing of the loss to the child, of that one year of opportunity.

There is another feature connected with our economy program, and that is this: Since we have cut out so many of the special departments of our school, such as the Commercial Department, Domestic Science Course, the opportunity for landing work for our graduates is very much narrowed. A few years ago, most of our girls secured very good jobs at office work, in banks, as stenographers, or assistant bookkeepers. Now the majority of them have to, from necessity, take domestic work, since the opportunities are so much narrowed. A few get work in cafe's, cafeterias, or in stores as clerks; and an occasional one is accepted for training as a nurse. We believe that this curtailment of opportunities is out of all proportion to the amount of money saved in dropping these departments.

I am mentioning this feature just as an illustration of some of the things that our very much restricted budget, has done for us, and we hope that the Church will see to it that this condition is not made permanent. Members of Presbytery are, of course, familiar with the changed business conditions in all lines from that of a year ago. Certainly more money is in circulation at this time, but so far, we have noticed very little increase in contributions and these increases are almost entirely confined to the smaller churches—whether in city or country.

A very sharp reduction in the amount received from the Duke Endowment is also noted. A 20% reduction from that of a year ago. Now, while our receipts have not benefitted by the improved business conditions, there has been a decided change in expenses. Things that we have to buy are without exception, higher than they were a year ago. Coal is costing us nearly twice as much. The dairy food that we have to buy cost three times as much, and the average advance of all articles purchased is from 75% to 100%. We have to recognize this situation and take steps to meet it.

As for Winston-Salem Presbytery, we note with disappointment, that this Presbytery has fallen behind in its giving. We called attention in our last report to the fact that Winston-Salem's leading the other Presbyteries in the per-capita giving was due to the liberality of a few wealthy churches and individuals. At the present time, we note a more liberal contribution from the smaller churches and communities, but a very heavy falling off from the larger ones. So that the total giving for the year just closed is 13c per member less than for the same period a year ago.

Our last report showed that Winston-Salem had more than double the number of children in the Orphanage than would be her allotment, figured on a per member basis. There were 38 children here at that time. Since that last report, 7 new children have entered the Orphanage from Winston-Salem Presbytery. Two have left. So that at the present time, there are 43 children

here from your Presbytery. These children are from the following counties:

From Ashe County, 7; from Davidson County, 2; from Surry County, 4; from Stokes County, 3; from Yadkin County, 5; from Forsyth County, 22.

Only one Presbytery has more children here than you have. You are tied with Mecklenburg. You have as many as Granville and Kings Mountain combined, and six more than Fayetteville Presbytery—and Fayetteville is next to the largest Presbytery represented in our Synod.

We are calling these things to your attention because we believe it is possible that members of your Presbytery may only look at the per capita giving of your Presbytery and not take into consideration what the Orphanage is doing for your Presbytery.

We are desperately in need at this time, and we believe Winston-Salem should, and can, come to our relief by earnest systematic endeavor to enlist all the churches and every member of every church in giving to the Orphanage now and all through the year.

We have certainly not failed you, when you call on us for help. Please do not fail us, because we face a serious situation.

Rev. C. E. Clarke offered an overture to the General Assembly concerning radio programs. This paper was adopted and ordered sent to the General Assembly as an overture from the Presbytery. The overture is as follows: In view of the fact that the radio has become such a tremendous factor in disseminating information to the nation, and also the world, and in view of the further fact that, practically every home has a radio, around which the entire family sits and listens, and in view of the fact that the Broadcasting Companies, at present, broadcast anything offered, provided it pays—in money—thus forcing upon the general public, listening in, whatever their offerings happen to be; and in view of the further fact that there is offered, at various times, in fact almost every program carries items that are not even decent, some of them positively nauseating, and morally rotten, and extremely dangerous and poisonous to the minds of both the old and young.

For these reasons, and others too numerous to mention, we the Session of the Geo. W. Lee Memorial Presbyterian Church of Winston-Salem, do most earnestly sincerely, and prayerfully call this matter to the attention of the Presbytery and recommend that the Presbytery overture the General Assembly to get to work through the proper channels to cause to be created a board of censure to control the class and character of programs offered to the public over the radio.

Invitation for Fall Meeting

An invitation to meet in the Lansing and Gillespie Churches on Tuesday, September 11th at 11:00 A. M. was accepted.

By vote of the Presbytery a special prayer was offered for Mr. Ed Vaughn, an elder of the First Church of Winston-Salem, who had just been injured by a train.

Rev. John D. Smith presented the following Resolutions of Thanks, which was adopted:

The minutes were read and adopted.

The following minutes of the Commission to study the needs of a Church at Big Ridge and to take such action as they saw fit, were read and admitted to record:

Report of Commission to Investigate Need of Church at Big Ridge

The following members of the Commission appointed to study the needs of a Church at Big Ridge and "to take such action as it deems wise" met in the Big Ridge School building on September 9th, 1934 at 3:20 P. M.: Revs. R. H. Stone, Chairman, J. W. Luke, D. F. Helm and Elders H. M. Darnell and E. A. McNeill. The meeting was opened with prayer in the presence of a congregation of people. After the devotional exercises were conducted a sermon was preached from the text John 20:21.

Mr. E. A. McNeill was appointed clerk of the Commission.

A petition requesting the organization of a Presbyterian Church was read. Twenty three names answered to the roll. Rev. D. F. Helm certified that they were all baptized Christians. There was a study of the conditions and it was by vote the unanimous decision that a Church should be organized.

The presiding minister propounded the Constitutional question, which was answered in the affirmative by the uplifted hand. The petitioners were asked to stand and were constituted a Church according to the Word of God and the faith and order of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

Different members of the Commission extended greetings to the new congregation.

After the singing of "Blest be the tie that binds" the benediction was pronounced.

Presbytery took recess for fifteen minutes after which Elder R. C. Carson brought greetings from Wilmington Presbytery. Presbytery expressed its appreciation by standing, and at the same time recognizing the presence of Mrs. Carson.

A communication from Dr. H. W. McLaughlin in regard to "No Pastorless Presbyterian Churches" was read. Presbytery declined to adopt the paper presented.

Partial Report of Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee suggests that for an Executive Committee on Vacancy and Supplies the following be elected: Revs. J. W. Witherspoon, W. I. Howell, Jr., and Elder W. W. Burke. The report was adopted.

The Committee on Calls and Supplies reported that nothing had come into their hands.

The invitation of the Thomasville Church for the Spring Meeting was accepted, Presbytery to meet at 11:00 A. M. on the second Tuesday in April.

The report of the Stewardship Committee was approved and the recommendations adopted as amended.

Report of the Stewardship Committee

We note with joy and gratitude to Almighty God the splendid increase of \$36,450 to the Assembly's Benevolent Causes April 1 to August 1, 1934, over the same period of last year. We feel that it is a most hopeful sign in our Local Work that this increase began in our Synodical and Presbyterian work last year, the increase to Benevolences in our Presbytery for the year 1933-34 being \$361.00.

The following recommendations are offered:

1. That every Church in the Presbytery be urged to make a thorough Every Member Canvass for Local Expenses and all Church Benevolences on the second Sunday, March 10, 1935; that March 24, 1935 be designated as Loyalty Sunday, and that individuals who have made pledges and subscribers who are in arrears be urged to make special contributions to their Churches on this date.

2. That Pastors and Church Officers be urged to set aside the month of February as a period of intensive preparation and education for the Every Member Canvass; that they cooperate to the utmost with the Synodical and Presbyterian Secretaries of Stewardship, and secure and distribute such literature as may be available, encouraging their people toward larger giving and a larger Stewardship of life.

3. That as a means of inspiration, information and preparation for the E. M. C. three group conferences be held in the place of the meeting heretofore held at Yadkinville, and that fixing the dates for these conferences be left to the Stewardship Committee and the Stated Clerk.

4. That we earnestly urge our Ministers and Church Officers to conduct an active campaign for tithers and proportionate givers in every congregation. That as a practical means to this end, we join with our Synod and General Assembly in whole heartedly endorsing the Belmont Covenant Plan, and commend it for adoption by every Church in the Presbytery.

5. That the Stewardship Committee be authorized to secure either Rev. G. L. Whitely or some one else to make an address at the Group Conferences on the Belmont Covenant Plan; and that this Committee be authorized to make the other arrangements necessary to complete the program.

6. That our Presbytery and Churches follow the system of per centages to Benevolent Causes as adopted by Synod:

Presbytery was led in a season of prayer by various ministers and took recess until 7:30 P. M.

Evening Session

Presbytery met at 7:30 o'clock with the Rev. W. I. Howell, Jr., Chairman of the Committee on Home Missions, presiding. Rev. R. W. Childress of the Presbytery of Montgomery was introduced to the Presbytery and made an address on Home Missions.

Special music was rendered by the choir from the Glade Valley High School.

Mr. Jos. B. Johnston Superintendent of the Presbyterian Orphans' Home, spoke in the interest of that institution.

Presbytery, by rising vote, expressed its appreciation of the addresses of Messrs. Childress and Johnston and the singing of the Glade Valley students.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was adopted with its recommendations.

Report of the Committee on Foreign Missions

It is with pleasure your Committee brings report of God's manifest blessings upon our Foreign Mission work. Cheering news comes from every field, emphasizing the fruitfulness of the work, evident in the spiritual growth of the Christian membership

and the constant ingathering of precious souls. In all this we recognize, with profound gratitude the hand of the Great Head of the church. Thus is He, encouraging us to prosecute the work with even greater fervour and relying upon His grace and promised aid, we are to expect still greater results.

The grim determination and sheer heroism that have enabled our missionaries to carry on during the emergency of the last four years, is a challenge to the utmost in order to turn back into the work liberal portions of their own meager salaries, in order to save certain units of the work from perishing. We leave you to "digest" this amazing sacrifice of our workers, with the warning that nerves will not endure the strain, nor bodies the continuous abuse of over work. They must be relieved or dire results will follow.

A great many of our people have the idea that the missionary's salary is the only item of expense, and hence contrast that with the various causes here at home; for instance, education in schools and colleges, education for the ministry, evangelism, sustentation, ministerial relief etc. Well, let us note some items of mission expense exclusive of the missionary's salary.

Foreign Missions includes all the above and in addition medical and dental bills, children's stipends, furlough travel, running expenses on the field, including 1,169 native workers, 23 hospitals, 1,806 chapels and places of regular meetings and 3,967 native helpers, doctors, preachers, teachers, Bible women, colporteurs, etc. For all this work exclusive of the salaries of the missionary, the Southern Presbyterian Church appropriated only \$96,000. You will at once see that this meager sum is entirely inadequate to support the work. Nevertheless the fact remains that this is the amount appropriated by our Church, and the only funds beyond this have been supplied by the missionaries themselves out of their own personal salaries and the gifts of the natives.

There seems to be a misunderstanding in the minds of many of our people that this is to be an off year for Foreign Missions and that the Churches and societies will not be expected to do very much by way of support. Some of our people are beginning to speak of one year as "Home Mission Year" and the next year as "Foreign Mission Year" as though these two causes were expected to claim the attention of the Church only in alternate years. This is a harmful mistake. Foreign Missions and Home Missions both, claim the attention of our people every year. Because there is no Foreign Mission study book this year, it is all the more necessary to emphasize the special week of Prayer and Self-Denial in January.

Recommendations:

In view of the financial condition of the Foreign Mission treasury, your Committee asks Presbytery to adopt and carry out as far as possible, the Recommendations sent down by our last General Assembly which are as follows:

1. That this Assembly record its unbounded gratitude to God for the greatest ingathering of souls in the more than seventy years of our Foreign Mission history.

2. That the Assembly recognize in these amazing results on our Foreign Mission fields the unmistakable presence and power of God, and call upon the whole Church, laying aside all fear and depending upon His promise, to move forward in the supreme mission of taking the world for Christ; and further, that the Executive Committee of Foreign Missions be authorized in the name of the General Assembly to issue to all our people a ringing challenge to a missionary advance through an unprecedented outpouring of prayer and life and means for the salvation of the world.

3. That the Assembly reiterate its firm conviction that the preaching of the Gospel to all the world is the prime mission of the Church, and that in all our planning for the year the priority of this task should be kept constantly in remembrance.

4. That recognizing the need of a living touch with the Foreign Mission enterprise, ministers and their congregations invite foreign missionaries on furlough as often as opportunity affords to present their work in person, such arrangements being possible through the Educational Department of the Foreign Mission Committee.

5. That Foreign Mission Chairmen of Synods and Presbyteries be urged to cooperate as fully as possible with the Executive Committee in studying Foreign Mission attitudes within their territories, securing such help as the Committee can give toward building up greater Foreign Mission enthusiasm and support.

6. That every pastor present vigorously to the leaders of all organizations in his church, their relationship to, and responsibility for, Foreign Missions, in the hope that through missionary literature, missionary and secretarial visits, special programs, moving pictures, Mission Study classes, etc., every group may be better informed regarding our Church's Foreign Mission responsibility.

7. That all Sunday Schools this year be urged to cooperate in the special Missionary Education Program on Japan, and that they do their utmost toward raising in full the budget of our Japan Mission.

8. That all young people's organizations this year be urged to cooperate in the Missionary Educational Program on China, and that they be encouraged to devote their Foreign Mission offerings to the raising of the evangelistic budget of that field.

9. That churches, societies, and individuals assume, wherever practicable, definite responsibility for definite parts of the Foreign Mission work.

10. That the Foreign Mission month of January, 1935, be observed in all our churches with great faith and expectation, that all our ministers be urged to preach frequently and fervently on missions, and that the whole Church, in all her organizations of men, women, and young people, be called to her knees before God in prayer and earnest supplication for this work.

11. That every church in the Assembly, with its organizations, be asked to observe January 20-27 as the Week of Prayer and Self-Denial for Foreign Missions, and that all sessions be urged to arrange for supplemental offerings in the churches in January-

Rev. W. I. Howell, Jr., was granted evangelistic powers in the Elkin and Sparta fields until such time as ordained ministers may be secured for these fields.

The following recommendations on Stated Supply were adopted as amended:

Recommendations Adopted by the Synod of N. C. Sept. 6, 1934 on Stated Supply

1. That Synod place its whole hearted approval upon this plan adopted by two General Assemblies and seventy-six out of the ninety Presbyteries.

2. That Synod urge upon each of its constituent Presbyteries to recognize its Presbyterian authority as defined in the Book of Church Order, paragraphs 60 and 76, and realize its responsibility for taking care of its ministers and Churches.

3. That each Presbytery appoint a committee consisting of two ministers and one ruling elder, define its duties, and charge it with the responsibility of advising Presbytery in the exercise of the spiritual oversight of the Churches and ministers under its care, and also charge it with the duty of cooperating with Synod's Committee on Stated Supply in effecting necessary changes in pastorates throughout the Synod.

4. That Synod urge upon every Church and minister in the Synod to cooperate with the Presbytery in the exercise of its Presbyterian authority, and also to cooperate with Synod's committee in its efforts in behalf of the ministers and Churches.

5. That each Presbytery seek to enlarge its Sunday School, Home Mission, and Evangelistic work, and to seriously consider the needs and possibilities of doing some colportage work in connection with the American Bible Society and in this way use as many as possible of our ministers who are now unemployed.

6. That Synod undertake to raise a fund through Rev. E. E. Gillespie, D. D., to take care of the ministers in the Synod who are "unemployed". That these men be put to work, as far as possible, under Dr. Gillespie in cooperation with the Superintendents and Chairmen of Home Missions in the Presbyteries; and that Dr. Gillespie appeal first to the active ministers of the Synod.

7. (Copied from the Assembly's Minutes adopted 1934) "In order to secure uniformity of action and accomplish the transfer from Synod to Synod of the ministerial applicants, it is recommended that the Synodical Chairmen of Committees of Stated Supply meet once each year and that the expenses of the Chairman or representative be defrayed by the Synod."

Presbytery took recess for five minutes after which Rev. J. W. Witherspoon preached the Communion sermon. The Lord's Table was presided over by Rev. C. W. Robinson and he was assisted by Elders W. W. Burke, H. D. Monroe, J. C. Crawford and W. T. Rogers in the distribution of the elements.

Presbytery instructed the Stated Clerk to write Elder J. H. Thompson expressing our appreciation for his long and faithful service as Treasurer of Presbytery's Home Mission Committee.

Presbytery adopted by a rising vote the additional report of the Committee on Resolution of Thanks.

APPENDIX

Belmont Covenant Plan

"This movement, called the Belmont Covenant Plan, in brief, is a covenant between the members of the individual Church, in which they mutually agree to give a tenth of their income for a definite period of time to the causes of the Church. Included in these are: Current Expenses, Benevolences, and any other local project determined by the congregation itself.

"The Covenant, which has already been used in more than thirty Churches so far, is substantially as follows:

"Having taken Jesus Christ as my Lord and Saviour, I realize that by that decision I became His subject; and being His servant, I am to be faithful in serving every way I can; therefore,

1st. In gratitude to Him for what He has done for me in the past and for what He has promised to do in the future; and

2nd. Feeling my dependence upon Him for the needs of my body, mind, soul and family; and

3rd. Recognizing the many blessings that come to me in being a part of the congregation of the Church; and

4th. Grateful for a beautiful Church building which He has enabled me to have; and

5th. Feeling that I do not want others to carry their own part of the work and mine also; and

6th. Since there is a crisis and an emergency in the financial needs of my Church, I join with my fellow members in doing my part by giving one-tenth of my income weekly for thirteen weeks, beginning Sunday....., and ending Sunday, inclusive. I feel that this is my part of the work, and that in doing this I do my part.

I will attend Church each Sunday and bring my offering, unless providentially hindered, and if I do not get to Church to bring my offering, I expect a deacon to call at my home or place of business and receive it for my Church."

"The results in the Churches which have adopted this plan have been amazing, in many instances producing an increase of more than three hundred per cent over a given period. And in practically every Church that has finished the initial period of agreement, seventy to eighty per cent of the covenanters have voluntarily agreed to continue the plan throughout the remainder of the Church Year."—Copied from the Assembly's Minutes 1934, Pages 52-53.
