

CONSTITUTION AND SUPPLEMENT

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this association shall be the West Liberty Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose of this association shall be to promote Christian fellowship and cooperation among the churches affiliated with this association; to uphold the doctrines and principles of our Baptist faith and to encourage the churches to be loyal to and practice these doctrines and principles; to promote the preaching and teaching of God's word; the enlisting and training of all Christians for service; to promote missions, benevolences, stewardship, Christian education, and the winning of all men to Christ to the ends of the earth; to cooperate with the North Carolina Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in a world-wide mission program.

ARTICLE III - BAPTIST DOCTRINE

THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE, as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in May 1925, shall be the Articles of Faith adopted by this body.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

This association shall be composed of messengers from the affiliating churches. When such messengers are elected by the association, they shall be seated and entitled to participate in the affairs of the body. Each church affiliated with this association shall be entitled to three messengers for the first fifty members or fraction thereof, and one additional messenger for every one hundred members or fraction thereof, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this association shall be moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, pianist, song leader, associational missionary, and the head officer of each associational organization. These officers, except the associational missionary, shall be nominated and elected by this association during the first session of the annual meeting and shall continue to serve until the close of the following annual session or until their successors shall be elected and installed.

Section 2. The associational missionary shall be elected as need arises and his tenure of service shall be indefinite.

ARTICLE VI - AUTONOMY, AUTHORITY AND ASSISTANCE

Section 1. This association shall be an autonomous (selfgoverning) body and therefore reserves the right to determine its own policies and direct its own business. It may refuse to seat messengers who are not in fellowship or doctrinal agreement with this body, or whose churches are not.

Section 2. As to authority, this body shall never exercise any authority over, or give direction to any church or churches, which are affiliated with it or which have been affiliated with it.

Section 3. As to assistance, this association shall stand ready to lend any assistance or counsel to any church making request for such help.

ARTICLE VII - ORGANIZATIONS

Section 1. This body shall encourage and promote such associational organizations as Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music and such other organizations which are in keeping with the purpose of this association, with their full staffs and programs necessary for the promotion of the work. Section 2. The officers of these organizations shall be elected by the respective organizations, but these officers must be approved by the association in its annual meeting.

ARTICLE VIII - MEETINGS

Section 1. The association shall hold an annual meeting with a morning, afternoon and evening session on the Thursday following the first Sunday in August. The place of the meeting (s) shall be in one of the affiliating churches.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall have the power to change the starting time and/or place of the annual meeting in case of emergency or necessity.

Section 3. This association shall promote regular meetings of all its organizations and its committees as shall prove most effective for carrying out the total purpose of the association.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Executive Committee:

(a) The Executive Committee shall be composed of the pastor of each of the cooperating churches and one lay member from each cooperating church who is to be elected by the church, heads of the organizations and the officers of the association.

(b) As to meetings, the Executive Committee shall have quarterly meetings. The time, place and date are to be determined by the committee itself.

(c) As to called meetings, none shall be called unless it is absolutely necessary. Called meetings can be called only by the moderator or someone designated by him.

(d) The moderator of the association shall serve as the chairman of the Executive Committee. The vice-moderator shall serve as chairman in event of the absence of the moderator. The clerk of the association shall serve as secretary of the Executive Committee.

(e) The task of the Executive Committee shall be to attend

to all matters of the association between annual meetings; promote all progress authorized by the association, and carry out all directives given by the association. It shall make an annual report to the association of all work carried on and all finances handled.

Section 2. Standing Committees:

This association shall have the following Standing Committees, named by the moderator before the close of the annual meeting to serve until the close of the next annual meeting, namely, (a) Program (b) Nominating (c) Missions, Finance, and Budget (d) Credentials and (e) Resolutions.

(a) The Program Committee shall consist of the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk and two members named by the moderator. This committee shall begin its work in May prior to the annual meeting of the association. The Program Committee shall be responsible for working out a well-rounded program for the annual meeting in which all the work of the association and the denominational interests are fairly represented and for choosing the preacher and alternate for the annual meeting of the association, the Program Committee will be responsible for such adjustments or changes in the suggested program as becomes necessary for the effective presentation of the work. The vice-moderator, or someone appointed by him, shall always present the program to the messengers of the annual meeting.

(b) The Nominating Committee shall consist of three members who shall make plans to present for nomination at the annual meeting of the association all officers and representatives, except the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk and treasurer, who shall be nominated from the floor. They shall, moreover, receive from the associational organizations, the names of their officers and place them before the annual meeting of the association for approval or disapproval. This committee shall serve throughout the year, meaning that any time an office of the officers or representatives becomes vacant, it shall present a nomination to the Executive Committee. This committee shall meet in May prior to the annual session in order that it may intelligently do its best and shall meet at such times as is necessary.

(c) The Missions, Budget and Finance Committee shall be

composed of the moderator, associational missionary, a pastor, a layman, a laywoman, and a representative from each of the associational organizations. The duty of this committee is to work with the associational missionary in planning and promoting a missions program. Recommendations: This committee shall elect its won chairman and secretary. This committee shall endeavor to lead the churches (1) to adopt and use the best methods of financing, (2) to support associational missions and world missions causes through the Cooperative Program with regular gifts.

(d) The Evangelism Committee shall be composed of three members who are vitally interested in the Southern Baptist Program of Evangelism. This committee shall lead in promoting this program of Evangelism in the association.

(e) The Credentials Committee shall be composed of three members whose duties are as follows:

1. Stand ready to counsel with leaders of any church wishing to affiliate with the association.

2. Examine the application of churches seeking to affiliate with the association.

3. Make the necessary and appropriate recommendations to the association concerning the admission or readmission of a church to the fellowship of the association.

(f) The Resolutions Committee shall be composed of three members. Its duties shall be to bring before this body any necessary resolutions.

Section 3. Other committees:

The association may have other committees as the need arises or that are deemed necessary by the body. The work of such committees, however, shall in no instance overlap nor conflict with the work of any of the standing committees and its duties shall be limited to the specific instructions which are to be given it at the time of its appointment.

ARTICLE X - REPRESENTATIVES

This association shall have the following representatives: (1) Memorials, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aged, (4) Baptist Hospitals, (5) Christian Education, (6) State Missions, (7) Cooperative Program, (8) Christian Action League, and others that may become necessary.

The representative of Memorials shall be responsible for preparing a brief memorial service to be given at the annual meeting.

All other representatives shall have as their primary concern and responsibility that of truly representing their respective agency or cause and give a report to the annual meeting of the association.

LARTICLE XI - AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any meeting of the association by a majority vote of the messengers present, provided notice of such a change has been given at the morning session and voted upon at the night session.

SUPPLEMENT

 In parliamentary procedure, this body shall be governed by ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER.

2. The fiscal year of this association shall be from the first day of August to the last day of July, inclusive. Annual reports to the association shall cover this period.

3. All officers of the association must be members of churches affiliated with this association, in good standing and recognized for their knowledge of and loyalty to Southern Baptist acctrines and programs.

4. The duties of the officers shall be as follows:

The Moderator shall call to order and preside over the meetings of the association and the Executive Committee. He shall view and direct the affairs of the association in an orderly manner and Christian spirit. He may ask other officers and members of the addy to preside if necessary.

The Mice-Moderator may, if the moderator so directs, preside over the associational meetings. He shall preside at all meetings in the absence of the moderator. He shall assist the moderator in such ways as the moderator may direct.

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The Clerk shall keep a full and accurate record of all business of the association and the Executive Committee. At each meeting, he shall be prepared to give all minutes of the previous meeting. All records shall be kept in a safe place. He shall publish the minutes of the association.

The Treasurer shall receive all funds of and for the association, and shall disburse all funds in accordance with the adopted associational budget or the specified instructions of the association or the Executive Committee. He shall keep accurate records of all moneys received, with sources and designations of same. He shall make reports to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee and the annual meeting of the association of all receipts and expenditures.

The Pianist shall play the instrument at the annual meeting and all called meetings. He or she will cooperate with the Program Committee.

The Song Leader shall lead the singing at the annual meeting. He or she shall cooperate with the Program Committee.

The Historian shall write in orderly form the events of the association, beginning with its organization. The association should request the churches and individuals who may possess historical information about the association to make it accessible to the historian. He shall make record of current events of each fiscal year and read his annual chapter to the annual meeting of the association for adoption. These records shall be kept in a safe place.

The Associational Missionary shall reveal a vital concern for all the work of the association. Much of his work will be in advisory capacity. He shall promote the progress of the denomination. He shall be a servant and not a master. He shall be an ex-officio member of all committees. He shall hold no office in the association or any of its organizations other than that of associational missionary. He shall be an understanding friend to pastors, officers of the association, and people in the association and churches at large.

The Heads of the Associational Organizations shall use the latest methods and plans of Southern Baptists in the formulation of their work and lead their organizations to serve and help the churches.

5. All associational organizations and regular committees shall make reports to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee and/or to the association. The Executive Committee shall exercise authority over these organizations and committees only to the extent of determining whether they are working within the bounds of the organizational programs as approved by the association.

6. A place shall be made in the order of business of the annual meeting of the association for miscellaneous business in the morning and afternoon.

7. Messengers of the association shall be accorded equal rights and privileges of the floor, provided each messenger who desires to speak shall rise and address the moderator and be recognized before he speaks. No messenger shall be entitled to speak on any subject more than twice until other messengers desiring to speak have been heard. Upon request of a messenger, or by consent of the body, the moderator may invite a visitor to speak during a discussion.

8. An affiliating church shall be one that is intimately in association and harmony with the purpose and doctrine of this association.

9. An association means a body of persons organized with a cooperative purpose in view.

10. As to the matter of the relation of churches to this association, churches do not join or become members of this association. If they did, they would become subject to the direction and authority of this association. Churches do, however, voluntarily affiliate in fellowship and in cooperation with other churches of this association. This association is made up of individual messengers from the churches affiliated with this association, and their action in sessions of the association in no way binds or obligates the churches. Each Baptist body is always sovereign within itself and never gives or receives directives from another body, although it may seek counsel from other bodies. Therefore, this association does not exclude a church from its fellowship or deal with it as a body for any cause. However, this association does have the authority to determine what churches shall be affiliated with it by reason of its power to seat, or refuse to seat, the messengers from a church not in harmony or fellowship, by doctrine and practice, with this association.

On the invitation of a church, this association may send a committee or committees into a church, for discussion only. If reports of unfaithfulness or disloyalty comes to the knowledge of the association, it may ask the Credentials Committee to inquire and report to the association.

11. Each church affiliated with this association shall send a full account of all work done during the year to the clerk of the association on a form provided by the clerk at least ten days before the annual meeting of the association.

12. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the Executive Committee.

13. This supplement to the constitution may be amended at any regular annual meeting of the association by a majority of the messengers present, provided notice of such a change has been given at the morning session and voted upon at the night session of the annual meeting.

OF THE

ONE HUNDRED-FIFTEENTH SESSION

OF THE

WEST LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Session Theme Thursday Morning Magnifying Christ Through Evangelism

1. The West Liberty Baptist Association met with Mount Pleasant Church, August 11, 1966, for its one hundred-fifteenth session. The session was opened by the singing of "Amazing Grace" and "Hold to God's Unchanging Hand," in memory of the late Rev. Tom Truett. Music was led by Rev. Calvin Thompson. 2. The Associational Moderator offered prayer and called the session to order, recognizing the visitors and seating the messengers. The visitors were Gordon Maddrey, representing the BAPTIST FOUNDATION, also representing the BIBLICAL RECORDER, in the absence of its editor, L. H. Hollingsworth, Wake Forest College; and Rev. Hadley Shields, new pastor of Shoal Creek Church.

3. The order of business was presented by the Rev. Calvin Thompson. On motion and vote the program was accepted, providing for necessary changes.

4. The moderator gave a report on the work of the association during the past year.

5. The report of the treasurer was given by Mr. W. E. Bates. Report adopted as read.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

This report may be one of over-enthusiasm for the fine way the Baptists of North Carolina are beginning to understand and use the Foundation. This has been a good year in Baptist Foundation work and we are eternally grateful to each of you for having a part in promoting the work of the Foundation.

We are indeed grateful to the pastors of this state for the wonderful cooperation they have accorded the Baptist Foundation by furnishing the names of indivudials who may be interested in the Foundation, by inviting us to their churches to speak on various occasions, and by discussing with us the problems, programs, and purposes of the Foundation whenever we had the opportunity. Many of our lay friends - lawyers, bankers, trust officers, and other interested individuals - have given of their time and have helped us materially in promoting our work.

Assets of the Foundation have increased during the past year and at the last accounting, around December, the total assets of the Foundation had reached approximately one million dollars including our real estate. Many of our people are setting up memorial funds, turst agreements, annuity agreements and are using other services provided by the Baptist Foundation. We believe we are organized in such a manner that we can answer most any request an individual makes of us, either through the church or as an individual, if he will make his wishes known to us. We can visit him individually and explain the work of the Foundation and how he may participate in it, or we can go to any group meeting that would provide an opportunity to discuss will making and uses of the Foundation. We covet your continued prayers for this work and hope that in the future you will make use of the facilities of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc.

7. Mr.L.H.Hollingsworth of Wake Forest College gave

a report on Christian Education, expressing the importance of having a Christian college closer to the people of Western Carolina.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

We Baptists, a Christian group seeking the betterment of the world, should be delighted that during this affluent age of ours, there are thousands of young people who are determined to get an education. Furthermore, we should be delighted that various institutions - governmental, religious, etc. - provide places of higher learning which greatly facilitate the transferral of knowledge.

Naturally, we have come to expect some specific results from a college education. First, we hope that by sending our youth to college, their chances to live a happy, fruitful life will be enhanced and that their spiritual values will be more firmly grounded upon truth. Second, in our western civiliaztion we assume that college attendance will in some way increase the ease of gaining and satisfaction of having a stable livelihood. Our Baptist institutions of higher learning, though far from perfect, yield these results.

Conscientious efforts are made by the administration to help our youth develop in Christlikeness. However, not all students who attend our Baptist schools come away exemplifying Christ; neither do all the youth who leave our own Christian firesides "show forth Christ." These Christian schools are dealing with individuals who are endowed by their Creator with a power of choice – a power which some will use to their own detriment regardless of the efforts expended to aid them in procuring for themselves the advantages of God and Right.

The colleges are academically accredited so that training received there is honored by secular concerns of our nation.

The more specific and most important task of Baptist schools is preparing young people for sending the gospel around the world. There is training available for almost any person who wants to better prepare himself to carry the Word. Our Baptist colleges and seminaries are dedicated to better preparing those whom Godhas called. Fruitland Bible Institute here in Western North Carolina is designed to help those preachers who have not had the advantage of higher education. Seminary Extension classes are also available.

Christian education needs our loving criticism, our encouragement, and our prayers.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

A pressing need of each church in our association is an undergirding of the Cooperative Program with prayer. Information on the world wide missionary work carried on through the Cooperative Program will form a basis by which your church can pray with knowledge and zeal.

The Cooperative Program must be nurtured in prayerbecause information alone is not enough. It is hoped that every church will have a special prayer for some mission cause supported through the Cooperative Program in the Prayer Service each week during the month of October.

We are witnessing the greatest missionary advance in Southern Baptist history in missionaries being sent, benevolent work done and training of young people for world wide service. This advance is being made through our missionaries, orphanages, schools, homes for the aged, and out Baptist hospitals. Through the Cooperative Program you literally feed the hungry, clothe the naked, heal the sick, and preach the gospel to the far corners of the earth.

We are making progress in our concern for those Jesus came to seek and to save. Each year more of our churches are increasing Cooperative Program giving and at the same time others are beginning whole hearted participation.

Several associations in North Carolina have 100% of their churches giving through the Cooperative Program. According to available records our association gave a total of \$1,304.79 this past year through the Cooperative Program. Twelve churches did not share in world missions through the Cooperative Program. With enthusiasm let us be faithful in worshipping with tithes and offerings, and our church sharing regularly through the Cooperative Program for the benefit of a lost world.

10. Mr. W. R. Wagoner gave a report on the Children's Homes expressing appreciation for help given, also the desire of a home in Western North Carolina in the near future.

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOMES

Under the impact of the life, ministry, and teachings of Christ and under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, North Carolina Baptists, eighty-one years ago launched a Christian ministry of child care. This has grown much and is widely recognized for its qualities of service and pioneering spirit. Sons and daughters of the Christian Homes are scattered throughout the world, actively engaged in all walks of life and making significant contributions to the uplift of mankind as a result of their early Christian training made possible by North Carolina Baptists and other friends.

As we continue to build upon foundations already laid, special attention is being given certain areas of child care. An already strong program of group care is being strengthened at Mills Home, Kennedy Home and Odum Home. A good degree of progress has been made to working with emotionally disturbed children at Greer Home in Chapel Hill. Prospects are encouraging for a home for children in the western part of the state. Constant attention is being given to more effective ways of meeting the highly specialized needs of children coming from broken and inadequate home situations.

We have a large number of good Christian homes for the care of foster children. More are needed in all sections of the state. Foster homes serve children of all ages and are of particular advantage for some who have special needs. Foster home parents may be of varying ages and circumstances in life. Couples with or without children of their own who have an abundance of love find this to be a challenging and rewarding opportunity of Christian service. Sincere appreciation is expressed to all who have, in any way, helped to support our

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child care ministry. We are thankful for increasing income through the Cooperative Program. Last year's Thanksgiving Offering is approaching \$315,000 and is the largest ever given. Special gifts and designations continue to provide a substantial part of our income. Through estate planning and the making of Christian wills, many are investing in present and future generations of boys and girls.

We covenant with you to face the future as we have in the past; to offer Christian nurture to distressed children in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

REPORT ON THE BAPTIST HOSPITAL

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

Reflection on the past year of life in our four Baptist Homes for the Aging is a reminder once again of the goodness of the Lord to us. We are constantly aware of the bountiful way in which He has blessed us, and this has been particularly true since our last report to the good people in our Baptist Associations.

During this time we have ministered to 172 deserving older men and women. All of these have been blessed by the love gifts of North Carolina Baptists, through the Special Day offering, received on the third Sunday of February each year, and through our share of the Cooperative Program. The large majority, at least 85%, have benefitted directly from these gifts and have actually been sustained at the point of their financial need.

The Special Day offering for 1966 is at an all time high and looks as if it might be \$100,000.00 for the first time. This is very good, and we are profoundly grateful. We must not forget, however, that, even though there has been a 5% increase in the offering from last year, costs have advanced by 7%.

We are in the midst of miracles, and the past year has been one in which we have witnessed unusual blessings from the Lord. There have been fewer deaths than previously, and the critical ill, in many instances, have been brought back to a measure of reasonably good health. Nursing care has been of the highest quality, and you would rejoice to know how far your concern and your gifts go in ministering to the needs of the residents, particularly at the point of tender loving care in illness.

Perhaps the outstanding paradox in all of our homes is that the first resident to receive a Medicare card, during this first year of the operation of Medicare, is our oldest resident, who never takes any medication at all and who does not need to see a doctor, or go to the hospital. She is Aunt Fannie Drumwright, who celebrated her 105th birthday in July. It is anticipated that construction will begin on our fifth Home in Yanceyville during the coming year, and when it is finished, we will be able to minister in all our Homes to 200 older men and women and relieve, in measure, the terrific pressure of a long waiting list of 170 people.

This ministry of love, in Christ's name, is dependent upon the concern, the love, the prayers, and the increased financial support of North Carolina Baptists. We are, therefore, going to count heavily on you and believe that you will not disappoint that aging people who are looking to you urgently for help.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE REPORT

There is more demanded of the Christian today than ever before in the history of the world. There is more to detract than ever before, thus causing a flagrant violation of the laws of God. Unless America comes back to God's will and Word we are doomed as a Christian nation. To all appearances there is a falling away in the churches in the U.S.A. The leadership of nearly every phase of American life is neglecting the word of God in their personal lives. To all outward appearances, they are church going persons. This does not make one a Christian. Personal faith in Jesus Christ as personal Lord and personal Savior is absolutely necessary if one is to be found in the Kingdom of God.

There are three immutable laws of God that need to become actively obeyed in faith in Christ:

1. "Ask whatsoever ye will, if faith believing, and ye shall receive it." There are three conditions necessary here:

Soul sincere desire, Be willing to let God fulfill it His way, and after God answers give Him back the results. God has deposited enough to take care of all requests, but faith to believe it is absolutely necessary.

2. "Whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap." Galatians 5. Like produces like. We cannot sow negligence, indifference, hatred and the sins and vices as mentioned in Galatians 5. Too many Christians sow to the flesh and then on Sunday they go to church and pray for a crop failure. We reap more of what we sow, and longer in time of what we have sown. Development of the Christian character depends upon what we sow.

3. "Whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." "The heavens declare the glory of God." How do we glorify God? In our deeds, in our reverence to God? by recommending God's good news to every person we meet. This is the only way to get back to God and unless we do so our nation is doomed. We glorify God through our lives. So let us praise Him more.

Pray for our President and our national leaders. Pray for our denominational leaders and churches. May we support our Baptist program against alcoholism, communism, and Un-American activities, and get in behind our Baptist program of mission advancement.

We are living in day of speed, time is running out; we may already be in the eleventh hour. If a witness is to be carried out in all faithfulness we must move more rapidly for our Lord lest night overtake us. But for the longsuffering of our Lord the end of time might have already been reached.

Constitution

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this association shall be the West Liberty Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose of this association shall be to promote Christian fellowship and cooperation among the churches affiliated with this association; to uphold the doctrines and principles of our Baptist faith and to encourage the churches to be loyal to and practice these doctrines and principles; to promote the preaching and teaching of God's word; the enlisting and training of all Christians for service; to promote missions, benevolences, stewardship, Christian education, and the winning of all men to Christ to the ends of the earth; to cooperate with the North Carolina Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in a world-wide mission program.

ARTICLE III - BAPTIST DOCTRINE

THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE, as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in May, 1925, shall be the Articles of Faith adopted by this body.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

This association shall be composed of messengers from the affiliating churches. When such messengers are elected by the association, they shall be seated and entitled to participate in the affairs of the body. Each church affiliated with this association shall be entitled to three messengers for the first fifty members or fraction thereof, and one additional messenger for every one hundred members or fraction thereof, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this association shall be moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, pianist, song leader, associational missionary, and the head officer of each associational organization. These officers, except the associational missionary, shall be nominated and elected by this association during the first session of the annual meeting and shall continue to serve until the close of the following annual session or until their successors shall be elected and installed.

Section 2. The associational missionary shall be elected as need arises and his tenure of service shall be indefinite.

ARTICLE VI - AUTONOMY, AUTHORITY AND ASSISTANCE

Section 1. This association shall be an autonomous (self-governing) body and therefore reserves the right to determine its own policies and direct its own business. It may refuse to seat messengers who are not in fellowship or doctrinal agreement with this body, or whose churches are not, Section 2. As to authority, this body shall never exercise any authority over, or give direction to any church or churches, which are affiliated with it or which have been affiliated with it.

Section 3. As to assistance, this association shall stand ready to lend any assistance or counsel to any church making request for such help.

ARTICLE VII - ORGANIZATIONS

Section 1. This body shall encourage and promote such associational organizations as Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music and such other organizations which are in keeping with the purpose of this association, with their full staffs and programs necessary for the promotion of the work.

Section 2. The officers of these organizations shall be elected by the respective organizations, but these officers must be approved by the association in its annual meeting,

ARTICLE VIII - MEETINGS

Section 1. The association shall hold an annual meeting with a morning, afternoon and evening session on the Thursday following the first Sunday in August. The place of the meeting(s) shall be in one of the affiliating churches.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall have the power to change the starting time and/or place of the annual meeting in case of emergency or necessity.

Section 3. This association shall promote regular meetings of all its organizations and its committees as shall prove most effective for carrying out the total purpose of the association.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Executive Committee:

(a) The Executive Committee shall be composed of the pastor of each of the cooperating churches and one lay member from each cooperating church who is to be elected by the church, heads of the organizations and the officers of the association.

(b) As to meetings, the Executive Committee shall have quarterly meetings. The time, place and date are to be determined by the committee itself.

(c) As to called meetings, none shall be called unless it is absolutely necessary. Called meetings can be called only by the moderator or someone designated by him.

(d) The moderator of the association shall serve as the chairman of the Executive Committee. The vice-moderator shall serve as chairman in event of the absence of the moderator. The clerk of the association shall serve as secretary of the Executive Committee.

(e) The task of the Executive Committee shall be to attend to all matters of the association between annual meetings; promote all progress authorized by the association, and carry out all directives given by the association. It shall make an annual report to the association of all work carried on and all finances handled.

Section 2. Standing Committees:

This association shall have the following Standing Committees, named by the moderator before the close of the annual meeting to serve until the close of the next annual meeting, namely, (a) Program (b) Nominating (c) Missions, Finance, and Budget (d) Credentials and (e) Resolutions.

(a) The Program Committee shall consist of the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk and two members named by the moderator. This committee shall begin its work in May prior to the annual meeting of the association. The Program Committee shall be responsible for working out a well-rounded program for the annual meeting in which all the work of the association and the denominational interests are fairly represented and for choosing the preacher and alternate for the annual sermon as well as the speakers it deems necessary. At the annual meeting of the association, the Program Committee will be responsible for such adjustments or changes in the suggested program as becomes necessary for the effective presentation of the work. The vice-moderator, or someone appointed by him, shall always present the program to the messengers of the annual meeting,

(b) The Nominating Committee shall consist of three members who shall make plans to present for nomination at the annual meeting of the association all officers and representatives, except the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk and treasurer, who shall be nominated from the floor. They shall, moreover, receive from the associational organizations, the names of their officers and place them before the annual meeting of the association for approval or disapproval. This committee shall serve throughout the year, meaning that any time anoffice of the officers or representatives becomes vacant, it shall present a nomination to the Executive Committee. This committee shall meet in May prior to the annual session in order that it may intelligently do its best and shall meet at such times as is necessary.

(c) The Missions, Budget and Finance Committee shall be composed of the moderator, associational missionary, a pastor, a layman, a laywoman, and a representative from each of the associational organizations. The duty of this committee is to work with the associational missionary in planning and promoting a missions program. Recommendations: This committee shall elect its own chairman and secterary. This committee shall endeavor to lead the churches (1) to adopt and use the best methods of financing, (2) to support associational missions and world missions causes through the Cooperative Program with regular gifts.

(d) The Evangelism Committee shall be composed of three members who are vitally interested in the Southern Baptist Program of Evangelism. This committee shall lead in promoting this program of Evangelism in the association.

(e) The Credentials Committee shall be composed of three members whose duties are as follows:

1. Stand ready to counsel with leaders of any church wishing to affiliate with the association,

2. Examine the application of churches seeking to affiliate with the association,

3. Make the necessary and appropriate recommendations to the association concerning the admission or readmission of a church to the fellowship of the association.

(f) The Resolutions Committee shall be composed of three members. Its duties shall be to bring before this body any necessary resolutions.

Section 3. Other Committees:

The association may have other committees as the need arises or that are deemed necessary by the body. The work of such committees, however, shall in no instance overlap nor conflict with the work of any of the standing committees and its duties shall be limited to the specific instructions which are to be given it at the time of its appointment.

ARTICLE X ~ REPRESENTATIVES

This association shall have the following representatives: (1) Memorials, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aged, (4) Baptist Hospitals, (5) Christian Education, (6) State Missions, (7) Cooperative Program, (8) Christian Action League, and others that may become necessary.

The representative of Memorials shall be responsible for preparing a brief memorial service to be given at the annual meeting,

All other representatives shall have as their primary concern and responsibility

that of truly representing their respective agency or cause and give a report to the annual meeting of the association.

ARTICLE XI - AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any meeting of the association by a majority vote of the messengers present, provided notice of such a change has been given at the morning session and voted upon at the night session.

SUPPLEMENT

1. In parliamentary procedure, this body shall be governed by ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER.

2. The fiscal year of this association shall be from the first day of August to the last day of July, inclusive. Annual reports to the association shall cover this period.

3. All officers of the association must be members of churches affiliated with this association, in good standing and recognized for their knowledge of and loyalty to Southern Baptist doctrines and programs.

4. The duties of the officers shall be as follows:

THE MODERATOR shall call to order and preside over the meetings of the association and the Executive Committee. He shall view and direct the affairs of the association in an orderly manner and Christian spirit. He may ask other officers and members of the body to preside if necessary.

THE VICE-MODERATOR may, if the moderator so directs, preside over the associational meetings. He shall preside at all meetings in the absence of the moderator. He shall assist the moderator in such ways as the moderator may direct.

THE CLERK shall keep a full and accurate record of all business of the association and the Executive Committee. At each meeting, he shall be prepared to give all minutes of the previous meeting, All records shall be kept in a safe place. He shall publish the minutes of the association.

THE TREASURER shall receive all funds of and for the association, and shall disburse all funds in accordance with the adopted associational budget or the specified instructions of the association or the Executive Committee. He shall keep accurate records of all moneys received, with sources and designations of same. He shall make reports to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee and the annual meeting of the association of all receipts and expenditures.

THE PIANIST shall play the instrument at the annual meeting and all called meetings. He or she will cooperate with the Program Committee.

THE SONG LEADER shall lead the singing at the annual meeting. He or she shall cooperate with the Program Committee.

THE HISTORIAN shall write in orderly form the events of the association, beginning with its organization. The association should request the churches and individuals who may possess historical information about the association to make it accessible to the historian. He shall make record of current events of each fiscal year and read his annual chapter to the annual meeting of the association for adoption. These records shall be kept in a safe place.

THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY shall reveal a vital concern for all the work of the association. Much of his work will be in advisory capacity. He shall promote the progress of the denomination. He shall be a servant and not a master. He shall be an ex-officio member of all committees. He shall hold no office in the association or any of its organizations other than that of associational missionary. He shall be an understanding friend to pastors, officers of the association, and people in the association and churches at large.

THE HEADS OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS shall use the latest methods and plans of Southern Baptists in the formulation of their work and lead their organizations to serve and help the churches.

5. All associational organizations and regular committees shall make reports to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee and/or to the association. The Executive Committee shall exercise authority over these organizations and committees only to the extent of determining whether they are working within the bounds of the organizational programs as approved by the association.

6. A place shall be made in the order of business of the annual meeting of the association for miscellaneous business in the morning and afternoon.

7. Messengers to the association shall be accorded equal rights and privileges of the floor, provided each messenger who desires to speak shall rise and address the moderator and be recognized before he speaks. No messenger shall be entitled to speak on any subject more than twice until other messengers desiring to speak have been heard. Upon request of a messenger, or by consent of the body, the moderator may invite a visitor to speak during a discussion.

8. An affiliating church shall be one that is intimately in association and harmony with the purpose and doctrine of this association.

9. An association means a body of persons organized with a cooperative purpose in view.

10. As to the matter of the relation of churches to this association, churches do not join or become members of this association. If they did, they would become subject to the direction and authority of this association. Churches do, however, voluntarily affiliate in fellowship and in cooperation with other churches of this association. This association is made up of individual messengers from the churches affiliated with this association, and their action in sessions of the association in no way binds or obligates the churches. Each Baptist body is always sovereign 'ithin itself and never gives or receives directives from another body, although it may seek counsel from other bodies. Therefore, this association does not exclude a church from its fellowship or deal with it as a body for any cause. However, this association does have the authority to determine what churches shall be affiliated with it by reason of its power to seat, or refuse to seat, the messengers from a church not in harmony or fellowship, by doctrine and practice, with this association.

On the invitation of a church, this association may send a committee or committees into a church, for discussion only. If reports of unfaithfulness or disloyalty comes to the knowledge of the association, it may ask the Credentials Committee to inquire and report to the association.

11. Each church affiliated with this association shall send a full account of all work done during the year to the clerk of the association on a form provided by the clerk at least ten days before the annual meeting of the association.

12. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the Executive Committee,

13. This supplement to the constitution may be amended at any regular annual meeting of the association by a majority of the messengers present, provided notice of such a change has been given at the morning session and voted upon at the night session of the annual meeting.

REPORT ON COOPERATIVE

Despite the fact that Southern Baptists have been sharing the gospel through the Cooperative Program since 1925 many do not know what this plan is. The question--What is the Cooperative Program?--is often heard.

The answer is simple. What the budget is to the local church the Cooperative Program is to the denomination. It is support for all missionary causes at home and abroad, it's preaching the gospel--it's healing in the name of Jesus through hospitals and clinics everywhere, it is teaching and training Christian leaders for all the great tasks of Kingdom endeavor.

As our people worship with tithes and offerings Sunday by Sunday and as the local church channels a part of its income through the Cooperative Program we enter into partnership with God and one another in obedience to the command, 'Go...Preach... Teach...'

Let us resolve to pray earnestly for all Kingdom work and support our prayers with sacrificial giving of self and substance.

Last year North Carolina Baptists gave \$5,787,311 through the Cooperative Program. Supplementing this with Special offerings amounting to \$2,897,639, we had a total of \$8,684,950 for all mission causes!

According to records available our Association gave \$1,704.40 during the last year for World Missions through the Cooperative Program.

We recommend;

(1) That each church plan, vigorously promote, and subscribe a worthy budget.(2) That special emphasis be given to prayer for the Cooperative Program during October.

(3) That each church give regularly through the Cooperative Program.

(4) That in response to the special call of the General Board State Convention we increase our Cooperative Program giving by at least 10% during the coming year.

ASSOCIATIONAL FOUNDATION REPORT

In the absence of our very efficient Executive Secretary of the Baptist Foundation of North Carolina, we shall attempt to provide a brief report for such use as may be necessary for the Associational Meetings beginning the first week in August, Certainly in the history of the work of the Baptist Foundation and especially in its last four years of active promotion, 1967 will be remembered as a year of tragedy with our leadership. For some months our Chairman, Dr. I. G. Greer, has been critically ill at his home in Chapel Hill. Some two weeks ago our Executive Secretary, C. Gordon Maddrey, was stricken with a series of heart attacks and has remained in critical condition in Rex Hospital. The loss of the leadership of these two faithful men at any time would be tragic, but especially as we approach the annual meetings of our Associations throughout the Convention.

If Mr. Maddrey were able to prepare this report, he would thrill us with the many interesting and challenging developments up to the time of his illness two weeks ago. This has been the most fruitful year in the work of the Foundation with many new commitments and marked progress in developing some of the projects of large standing. This is especially true of the new Home for the Aging in Yanceyville which you will hear much about in the report on the Homes for the Aging, Certainly this will continue to constitute a great challenge to many of our people who can find in the Baptist Foundation their finest opportunity for investing in the Kingdom Enterprises.

It will be our purpose to have a representative in all the Associational Meetings to bring a last minute report on the work of the Foundation and the condition of our fine leaders. Certainly all of us will continue to remember them in our prayers and best wishes.

Seminary Extension ...

Seminary Extension means much to the people of our area. It affords good training for pastors, Sunday School teachers and other church leaders. God has blessed us with this opportunity of preparing ourselves for a task that is so important that we cannot afford to be or do less than our best.

Courses are provided in Bible Study, History, Christian Education, and other areas which is tremendous help to all of those who take advantage of the opportunity by attending the classes.

Seminary Extension classes were held at Ranger Baptist Church in West Liberty

Association beginning at the first of January, and closing about the last of March of this year. Two courses were offered, one a survey course on the New Testament, and one in the history and doctrine of Baptists. We had an enrollment of 31 in one or more of these courses. The first of next January we will be opening classes once again in West Liberty Association hoping that we have a much larger enrollment this time.

Classes will be opening at The Little Brasstown Church in the Western North Carolina Association this fall, beginning on September 19 at 7:00 p.m.

Courses being offered are: Religious Education 115, Religious Education 215, New Testament 152 (Galatians) and Music 155. We would invite each and every one to come over to Brasstown for these classes.

Should we not 'Study to show ourselves approved unto God a workman---'

This is an opportunity for us to do so.

George W. Truett Camp Report...

The 1967 camping season for the George W. Truett Camp was a year of highlights. Many changes were noted in the program, staff, attendance and facilities.

The Camp Committee, with the approval of the Baptist State Convention borrowed \$1000.00 to match a gift of \$1000.00 from the Baptist State Convention in order to provide new recreational facilities for the 1968 camping season. The Building and Grounds Committee under the leadership of Rev. Robert Clegg did an outstanding work in planning and preparing these new facilities. The rain prevented the use of all the new facilities but the ground work was laid for 1968 and the future years for Truett Camp. A new ball field, carpet golf, shuffle board, indoor games, pingpong, horseshoe and several other items were prepared. The finest addition was the grading and graveling of the road. The enclosed financial report will show the work and cost of construction.

Many churches have responded very favorably with financial support for the camp.

The Camp Committee is asking each church in Region Ten to contribute at least \$35,00 per year for the next three or four years to pay for the cost of construction for 1968 and other long range plans for the camp. You will be hearing more about these long range plans in the coming months.

The most important part of the report is the part concerning the campers. We had 223 campers and staff in camp for the six weeks period. In addition to the number involved in the regular program there were 62 for a Sunbeam Day Camp. Youth Retreat with 56 attending, and a Church Young People Retreat with 16 in attendance.

During the camping season we had 36 professions of faith, numerous rededications, and 20 dedicated themselves for a church related vocation. In addition to our Camp Director, we had three counselors present each week for our Girls and a Camp pastor and Home Missionary.

Mrs. Platerlirro and Mrs. Taylor served as Home Missionaries for the week. Camp pastors were Rev. Collings, Rev. Bailey and Rev. Jimmy Hogsed.

The boys weeks were well attended and Rev. Rotan, Rev. Dean and Rev. Fish served as Pastors. Rev. Tony Radyoniuk served as Home Missionary. Counselors were furnished by the Brotherhood Department of the Baptist State Convention.

Words are inadequate to express appreciation to the cooks, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Rogers. These fine people served wonderful food and kept every one happy.

It is said an army is as good as its leader. A camp runs as smoothly and fullfills its objectives according to the Director. Enough cannot be said for Walter Middleton, Camp Director for 1967. Walter did one of the finest works I have witnessed in our Camp this summer. As far as I know I have not heard one word of criticism. Everything has been excellent. In fact many reports came back that "this is the best camp I have attended." All of this is due to the fine leadership of Walter. We are fortunate to have a man such as Walter to lead our camp. He will also serve as Director for 1968.

George W. Truett Camp is for Region Ten. It is ours to provide training for our young people and children. The success or failure will depend on the support of each church and individual with the Region. Will you join in this ministry as we seek to prepare our own for the future.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Miss Borings report ...

Southern Baptists now operate 39 Senior colleges, 15 Junior colleges, 7 academies, 4 Bible schools and 6 Seminaries. The American Baptist Theological Seminary is supported jointly with the National Baptist Convention.

In 1966-1967 we had a record enrollment of 102-250. This is approximately 5,520 above the previous year. In the past year the gifts from the Southern Baptist Convention increased 1,247,633 over the previous year.

Each year there are many graduates from these schools going forth in service for Christ. We are grateful that they had the opportunity to be trained in a Christian school. As Christian leaders and laymen, we need to support both the students and the faculty with our prayers as well as our financial aid.

Reports from the seminaries and schools show ministerial students declined 235 for the year. There was a loss of 103 in Home and Foreign Mission Volunteers, a loss of 101 in Ministers of Education and a gain of 32 in Church Music. Does this not call our attention to the fact that we need to encourage our young people to accept God's call into his service?

When should this encouragement begin? Christian Education does not begin at college level. Rather it begins at the pre-school level. A child does not need to go to a church sponsored school to have a background in basic Christian ideals. This background can be achieved through the local church and at home. The home should be the beginning of Christian education.

Time and condition will result in changes in Baptist supported schools. They must change to meet the needs of our times. One example of a change is found at Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute. In the coming year the school will change from two semesters of sixteen weeks each to three quarters of twelve weeks each.

Let us pray together that our school will provide for the needs of our people today. Let us also pray that our young people will seek an education for the purpose of finding more about life, how to live in our world, and finding God's will for their lives. If this is done, then we can report a great increase in full time church vocations.

CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Mrs. Ledford's report ...

Baptist Children's Homes of N. C., 1967

Helping children and young people to grow and develop toward Christian maturity is one of the greatest privileges in life. No task is more important than helping a child to grow into healthy, well-adjusted, responsible citizenship. At the Children's Homes we seek to provide the proper atmosphere, encouragement and supervision to assure the development of inborn, God given talents of our children.

This agency offers a variety of quality services to the children of families who have not been able to continue a satisfactory pattern of living together. A total of 33 cottages on five campuses provide group care of different kinds. There are two residences for emotionally disturbed children, convenient to a great medical center where psychiatric services are available. This fall, for the first time, a single cottage at Wallburg is being opened for the rehabilitation of boys.

In addition to group homes, the needs of many children are met through the use of Foster Homes. A growing interest in this phase of our work is encouraging. Many families are finding happiness and opportunity for service in caring for foster children. Thus, many boys and girls who otherwise would not have this opportunity, are privileged to grow up in Christian homes. Should you have an 'extra measure of love' to share in this way the Homes would like to know of your interest.

Regional case work centers, staffed by trained social workers, are located in six prominent areas of the State and add to the ability of the Homes to offer counseling service to distressed families and too those for whom family rehabilitation has been achieved. In June of 1967 the first of the new family living cottages was completed and is being used by brothers and sisters who can profit by sharing the same home. This building was provided by Mr. and Mrs. William M. York of Greensboro, and is named the York Cottage.

It is a model for the family living approach in group child care. A similar cottage is already under construction at Mills Home and two buildings of this type are now being built on the Kennedy Home campus.

The Child Development Center on the Mills Home Campus was established to serve the local community as a means of strengthening family life and to provide a demonstration and informational program which can offer assistance to churches in beginning any phase of weekday care and education for preschool children. During the 1967-68 session the Center will serve 70 children and their families in two kindergarden groups and nursery school groups, with about 35 children in full day care. The staff is providing consultation service upon request to churches interested in the program.

Members of the Board of Trustees and the Staff of Children's Homes are committed to the task of maintaining a Christian Program of Child Care - a program that will merit the undivided support and loyalty of our people and that will bring favor to our Lord. To that end it is our purpose to meet, as effectively as possible, the challenges of our day.

HOMES FOR AGING REPORT

Your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging have been on the move during the past year. In fact, we will be ready to move into our new Home at Yanceyville in September and will be able to receive 30 more dear old people into the family of our Homes. When the Yancyville Home, our fifth, is occupied, we will have a total of 200 deserving older men and women in our care in all the Homes.

As you know, we now have four Homes and an Infirmary in operation, Resthaven and the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem; the Albemarle Home at Albemarle; the Hamilton Home at Hamilton.

In these Homes you have an eternal investment and can rejoice in the loving care which you are making possible for our older people. The majority are financially needy persons, and are supplemented through the love gifts of North Carolina Baptists. Two sources of income from the churches are increasingly vital in the support of our residents - the Special Day Offering, received on the 3rd Sunday of February each year, and our share in the Cooperative Program.

The Special Day Offering for 1967 is at an all time high and has increased by 10% over last year. This is most commendable, but when we face the reality of costs, which have advanced by 20%, and the maintenance of a new Home and the care of 30 additional residents at Yanceyville, we could face a real crisis during the next year, unless the gifts from our Baptist people continue to increase in proportion to our needs.

We wish to thank all of our Baptist people across the State who are enabling us to minister to the aging in Christ's name, and we want all of you to know that each of your 5 Homes exist for the people from all over our great State. We could not operate without your love, your prayers, your concern, and your financial support.

In the midst of our joys have been our sorrows. Our oldest resident, Aunt Fannie

Drumwright, passed away in June, just short of her 106th birthday. She came to live with us at the age of 93, and the 13 years of her presence with us have been a shining example of the special significance of a Christian ministry to older people. The compassionate nursing care alone which this little lady received is reason enough to thank God for the people called Baptists, whose vision and concern for mankind have included the aging in answering the Master's call in Service of the Lord.

REPORT OF EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

This past year the churches of our Association baptized 45 persons. This represents a ratio of one baptism for every 30 members. We are grateful to God for every person who has been brought to confess Jesus Christ as Lord.

We call upon our churches to give themselves to the work that brought Christ from heaven to earth, evangelism. Evangelism is the heart of our churches existence. Evangelism must be a two-pronged thrust. Our churches face a tremendous evangelistic challenge in the Crusade of the Americas. This is more than just a two-week period of revivals. The Nomination Committees of the West Liberty and Western North Carolina Associations recommend that the two Associations meet together in the annual meetings; one day in Western Carolina and one day in West Liberty, and that the two associations use the same General Officers and adjust the Constitutions into one for both Associations.

Constitution

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this association shall be the West Liberty Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose of this association shall be to promote Christian fellowship and cooperation among the churches affiliated with this association; to uphold the doctrines and principles of our Baptist faith and to encourage the churches to be loyal to and practice these doctrines and principles; to promote the preaching and teaching of God's word; the enlisting and training of all Christians for service; to promote missions, benevolences, stewardship, Christian education, and the winning of all men to Christ to the ends of the earth; to cooperate with the North Carolina Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in a world-wide mission program.

ARTICLE III - BAPTIST DOC TRINE

THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE, as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in May, 1925, shall be the Articles of Faith adopted by this body.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

This association shall be composed of messengers from the affiliating churches. When such messengers are elected by the association, they shall be seated and entitled to participate in the affairs of the body. Each church affiliated with this association shall be entitled to three messengers for the first fifty members or fraction thereof, and one additional messenger for every one hundred members or fraction thereof, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this association shall be moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, pianist, song leader, associational missionary, and the head officer of each associational organization. These officers, except the associational missionary, shall be nominated and elected by this association during the first session of the annual meeting and shall continue to serve until the close of the following annual session or until their successors shall be elected and installed.

Section 2. The associational missionary shall be elected as need arises and his tenure of service shall be indefinite.

ARTICLE VI - AUTONOMY, AUTHORITY AND ASSISTANCE

Section 1. This association shall be an autonomous (self-governing) body and therefore reserves the right to determine its own policies and direct its own business. It may refuse to seat messengers who are not in fellowship or doctrinal agreement with this body, or whose churches are not.

Section 2. As to authority, this body shall never exercise any authority over, or give direction to any church or churches, which are affiliated with it or which have been affiliated with it.

Section 3. As to assistance, this association shall stand ready to lend any assistance or counsel to any church making request for such help.

ARTICLE VII - ORGANIZATIONS

Section 1. This body shall encourage and promote such associational organizations as Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music and such other organizations which are in keeping with the purpose of this association, with their full staffs and programs necessary for the promotion of the work.

Section 2. The officers of these organizations shall be elected by the respective organizations, but these officers must be approved by the association in its annual meeting.

ARTICLE VIII - MEETINGS

Section 1. The association shall hold an annual meeting with a morning, afternoon and evening session on the Thursday following the first Sunday in August, The place of the meeting(s) shall be in one of the affiliating churches.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall have the power to change the starting time and/or place of the annual meeting in case of emergency or necessity.

Section 3. This association shall promote regular meetings of all its organizations and its committees as shall prove most effective for carrying out the total purpose of the association.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Executive Committee:

(a) The Executive Committee shall be composed of the pastor of each of the cooperating churches and one lay member from each cooperating church who is to be elected by the church, heads of the organizations and the officers of the association.

(b) As to meetings, the Executive Committee shall have quarterly meetings. The time, place and date are to be determined by the committee itself.

(c) As to called meetings, none shall be called unless it is absolutely necessary. Called meetings can be called only by the moderator or someone designated by him.

(d) The moderator of the association shall serve as the chairman of the Executive Committee. The vice-moderator shall serve as chairman in event of the absence of the moderator. The clerk of the association shall serve as secretary of the Executive Committee.

(e) The task of the Executive Committee shall be to attend to all matters of the association between annual meetings; promote all progress authorized by the association, and carry out all directives given by the association. It shall make an annual report to the association of all work carried on and all finances handled.

Section 2. Standing Committees:

This association shall have the following Standing Committees, named by the moderator before the close of the annual meeting to serve until the close of the next annual meeting, namely, (a) Program (b) Nominating (c) Missions, Finance, and Budget (d) Credentials and (e) Resolutions.

(a) The Program Committee shall consist of the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk and two members named by the moderator. This committee shall begin its work in May prior to the annual meeting of the association. The Program Committee shall be responsible for working out a well-rounded program for the annual meeting in which all the work of the association and the denominational interests are fairly represented and for choosing the preacher and alternate for the annual sermon as well as the speakers it deems necessary. At the annual meeting of the association, the Program Committee will be responsible for such adjustments or changes in the suggested program as becomes necessary for the effective presentation of the work. The vice-moderator, or someone appointed by him, shall always present the program to the messengers of the annual meeting.

(b) The Nominating Committee shall consist of three members who shall make plans to present for nomination at the annual meeting of the association all officers and representatives, except the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk and treasurer, who shall be nominated from the floor. They shall, moreover, receive from the associational organizations, the names of their officers and place them before the annual meeting of the association for approval or disapproval. This committee shall serve throughout the year, meaning that any time an office of the officers or representatives becomes vacant, it shall present a nomination to the Executive Committee. This committee shall meet in May prior to the annual session in order that it may intelligently do its best and shall meet at such times as is necessary.

(c) The Missions, Budget and Finance Committee shall be composed of the moderator, associational missionary, a pastor, a layman, a laywoman, and a representative from each of the associational organizations. The duty of this committee is to work with the associational missionary in planning and promoting a missions program. Recommendations: This committee shall elect its own chairman and secretary. This committee shall endeavor to lead the churches (1) to adopt and use the best methods of financing, (2) to support associational missions and world missions causes through the Cooperative Program with regular gifts.

(d) The Evangelism Committee shall be composed of three members who are vitally interested in the Southern Baptist Program of Evangelism. This committee shall lead in promoting this program of Evangelism in the association.

(e) The Credentials Committee shall be composed of three members whose duties are as follows:

1. Stand ready to counsel with leaders of any church wishing to affiliate with the association.

2. Examine the application of churches seeking to affiliate with the association,

3. Make the necessary and appropriate recommendations to the association concerning the admission or readmission of a church to the fellowship of the association,

(f) The Resolutions Committee shall be composed of three members. Its duties shall be to bring before this body any necessary resolutions.

Section 3. Other Committees:

The association may have other committees as the need arises or that are deemed necessary by the body. The work of such committees, however, shall in no instance overlap nor conflict with the work of any of the standing committees and its duties shall be limited to the specific instructions which are to be given it at the time of its appointment.

ARTICLE X - REPRESENTATIVES

This association shall have the following representatives: (1) Memorials, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aged, (4) Baptist Hospitals, (5) Christian Education, (6) State Missions, (7) Cooperative Program, (8) Christian Action League, and others that may become necessary.

The representative of Memorials shall be responsible for preparing a brief memorial service to be given at the annual meeting.

All other representatives shall have as their primary concern and responsibility that of truly representing their respective agency or cause and give a report to the annual meeting of the association,

ARTICLE XI - AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any meeting of the association by a majority vote of the messengers present, provided notice of such a change has been given at the morning session and voted upon at the night session.

SUPPLEMENT

1. In parliamentary procedure, this body shall be governed by ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER,

2. The fiscal year of this association shall be from the first day of August to the last day of July, inclusive. Annual reports to the association shall cover this period.

3. All officers of the association must be members of churches affiliated with this association, an good standing and recognized for their knowledge of and loyalty to Southern Baptist doctrines and programs.

4. The duties of the officers shall be as follows:

THE MODERATOR shall call to order and preside over the meetings of the association and the Executive Committee. He shall view and direct the affairs of the association in an orderly manner and Christian spirit. He may ask other officers and members of the body to preside if necessary.

THE VICE-MODERATOR may, if the moderator so directs, preside over the associational meetings. He shall preside at all meetings in the absence of the moderator. He shall assist the moderator in such ways as the moderator may direct.

THE CLERK shall keep a full and accurate record of all business of the association and the Executive Committee. At each meeting, he shall be prepared to give all minutes of the previous meeting. All records shall be kept in a safe place. He shall publish the minutes of the association.

THE TREASURER shall receive all funds of and for the association, and shall disburse all funds in accordance with the adopted associational budget or the specified instructions of the association or the Executive Committee. He shall keep accurate records of all moneys received, with sources and designations of same. He shall make reports to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee and the annual meeting of the association of all receipts and expenditures.

THE PIANIST shall play the instrument at the annual meeting and all called meetings. He or she will cooperate with the Program Committee.

THE SONG LEADER shall lead the singing at the annual meeting. He or she shall cooperate with the Program Committee.

THE HISTORIAN shall write in orderly form the events of the association, beginning with its organization. The association should request the churches and individuals who may possess historical information about the association to make it accessible to the historian. He shall make record of current events of each fiscal year and read his annual chapter to the annual meeting of the association for adoption. These records shall be kept in a safe place.

THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY shall reveal a vital concern for all the work of the association. Much of his work will be in advisory capacity. He shall promote the progress of the denomination. He shall be a servant and not a master. He shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, He shall hold no office in the association or any of its organizations other than that of associational missionary. He shall be an understanding friend to pastors, officers of the association, and people in the association and churches at large.

THE HEADS OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS shall use the latest methods and plans of Southern Baptists in the formulation of their work and lead their organizations to serve and help the churches.

5. All associational organizations and regular committees shall make reports to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee and/or to the association. The Executive Committee shall exercise authority over these organizations and committees only to the extent of determining whether they are working within the bounds of the organizational programs as approved by the association.

6. A place shall be made in the order of business of the annual meeting of the association for miscellaneous business in the morning and afternoon.

7. Messengers to the association shall be accorded equal rights and privileges of the floor, provided each messenger who desires to speak shall rise and address the moderator and be recognized before he speaks. No messenger shall be entitled to speak on any subject more than twice until other messengers desiring to speak have been heard. Upon request of a messenger, or by consent of the body, the moderator may invite a visitor to speak during a discussion.

8. An affiliating church shall be one that is intimately in association and harmony with the purpose and doctrine of this association.

9. An association means a body of persons organized with a cooperative purpose in view.

10. As to the matter of the relation of churches to this association, churches do not join or become members of this association. If they did, they would become subject to the direction and authority of this association. Churches do, however, voluntarily affiliate in fellowship and in cooperation with other churches of this association. This association is made up of individual messengers from the churches affiliated with this association, and their action in sessions of the association in no way binds or obligates the churches. Each Baptist body is always sovereign 'ithin itself and never gives or receives directives from another body, although it may seek counsel from other bodies. Therefore, this association does not exclude a church from its fellowship or deal with it as a body for any cause. However, this association does have the authority to determine what churches shall be affiliated with it by reason of its power to seat, or refuse to seat, the messengers from a church not in harmony or fellowship, by doctrine and practice, with this association.

On the invitation of a church, this association may send a committee or committees into a church, for discussion only. If reports of unfaithfulness or disloyalty comes to the knowledge of the association, it may ask the Credentials Committee to inquire and report to the association.

11. Each church affiliated with this association shall send a full account of all work done during the year to the clerk of the association on a form provided by the clerk at least ten days before the annual meeting of the association.

12. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the Executive Committee.

13. This supplement to the constitution may be amended at any regular annual meeting of the association by a majority of the messengers present, provided notice of such a change has been given at the morning session and voted upon at the night session of the annual meeting,

It will suggest visitation of every family in the church by the Deacons, prayer by every church member and a Week-end Stewardship Revival. Many of the pilot churches have found this an effective way to increase giving and pledge the church budget.

According to records available our association gave \$725.51 during the last year for World Missions through the Cooperative Program.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend:

(1) That each church plan, vigorously promote, and subscribe a worthy budget.
(2) That each church have a special prayer for Cooperative Program causes during church services in October.

(3) That each church give regularly, a worthy percentage of each offering plate dollar through the Cooperative Program.

GEORGE W. TRUETT CAMP REPORT

The 1968 camping season was another successful year. Attendance was not as high as in 1967, but there was an excellent spirit and much was accomplished for the glory of our Lord.

The Truett Camp Committee expresses its deep appreciation to those serving on the camp staff. The Committee gives a special vote of thanks to Mr. James Roper, Camp Director, and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Rogers the Camp Dietitians.

The Development Program is still in progress under the direction of Rev. Robert Clegg of Sylva. However, it has slowed considerably, because of the lack of sufficient funds. The Baptist State Convention has agreed to assist in this development by contributing 50% of the cost. The churches of Region 10 must match this with the other 50%. The Truett Camp Committee of Region 10 urgently asks the churches to contribute at least \$35.00 per year, per church for the next four years. This will provide the funds needed to construct facilities for about 75-100 campers and counselors. This is an excellent opportunity for the churches of Region 10 to extend a vital and lasting ministry to our youth of our area.

Part of the development program will be started this fall. The Committee hopes o erect two new heated cabins, they will each house about 12 campers and two counselors. Eventually, the committee hopes to have six of these cabins.

A new swimming pool is also in the planning stage.

There are churches and individuals across Region 10 who could and should erect one of these cabins. To these churches, or individuals, we will extend special privileges for using these facilities.

All of these things will cost money. But if the churches give as suggested above, noney will not be a problem. Some churches can, and should, give more than \$35.00

per year. The Camp Committee believes that Truett Camp has great potential for teaching Christ in our area. They also believe that the witness it will bear to, and through, the youth of Region 10 makes all the expense and effort very worthwhile.

George W. Truett Camp is for Region 10. It is ours to provide training for our young people and children. It's success or failure will depend on the support of each church and individual in the Region.

You join us in this Ministry for Christ as we seek to prepare tomorrow's leaders today.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

This is a full year at your Baptist Hospital with more than thirty thousand sick people being given medical service and Christian ministry, and more than 165,000 visits being made to the clinics of the hospital. In addition to this, more than 700 persons are receiving training in the various fields of medical care and Christian service, and a vast amount of medical research is being done in the causes and treatments of the diseases which afflict us and our loved ones.

The Development Program, which is greatly to increase the capacity of the Medical Center to train and to serve, is progressing on schedule. The new power plant is scheduled to go into operation in October. The paramedical school building is due to be ready by next April. It will provide the best in teaching facilities and make it possible to double the capacity of our nine schools and to add new schools. The Medical School addition is to be ready by September 1969, and will allow that school to enlarge by 35%. Contracts are due to be let in October for the new patient building, which is to be completed in 1971. This building and the remodeling of the oldest part of the present plant will provide more than 200 new patients beds and greatly enlarge space and facilities for offices and for examinations and treatment of patients.

The cost of this Development Program is to be provided by interested individuals, corporations, foundations, and goverment agencies, which recognize the valuable service our Medical Center is rendering and the urgent need for greatly enlarging these services.

But this is a very difficult year financially, and our hospital has been forced to make important changes in its financial policies. In the face of the mounting costs and the increasing needs of our people, the hospital has been struggling with a growing deficit. We have been told this for several years now, but the gap has continued to increase between the cost of free service and the money we have provided for this service. The amount of the free service now will have to be governed by the amount of the Mother's Day Fund. In view of this, financial arrangements must be nade before a patient is admitted to the hospital, except in case of emergency. There will have to be a plan, including any insurance, for paying the estimated hospital bill, before the patient is discharged, unless the patient has been certified by his county welfare department or some other agency. The Mother's Day Fund will be used, as it has been, to pay the difference between the amount paid by the certifying agency and the total cost of caring for the patient.

Active North Carolina Baptist ministers will be given a 25% discount, and beyond this they will be charged the same as other patients. If they come through the clinic as service patients, they will be eligible for Mother's Day assistance if there is real need and other funds are not available.

The great concern at our Baptist Hospital is for our Service Patients who must have financial assistance if they get the specialized care they need. But the hospital has come to the point that it cannot continue to operate without money to cover the cost of caring for the patients it serves. In view of these circumstances, we believe the great majority of our pastors and our people will understand these changes and give their full cooperation. The Mother's Day Offering will need to be increased greatly if our hospital is to fulfill its mission to our people who need it. We want to assure our hospital that it can depend upon us in full measure.

CHILDREN'S HOME

North Carolina Baptists and other friends of the Childrens Homes are making possible a Christian way of life for hundreds of boys and girls who otherwise would be denied many of life's best opportunities. More than 1,300 children were assisted in some type of service during the past year.

All associated with the Children's Homes are deeply grateful for every type of support. Co-operative Program income through the churches is increasingly important. Last year's Thanksgiving offering is the largest ever-now approaching \$325,000. Special gifts, bequests through wills and estate planning provide much needed income and wonderful opportunities to invest in the lives of children and young people.

Encouraging progress is being made in the capital funds campaign to build a home for children in Western North Carolina to be located in Haywood County between Waynesville and Clyde. It is hoped that construction can begin in early 1969. The Western Home, in addition to providing group care, will strengthen families in the Western area. Four family style cottages have been constructed and dedicated during the past year-two at Mills Home and two at Kennedy Home. Two additional cottages will be constructed at Mills Home during the coming year. Funds for these buildings have come from bequests through estate planning by friends of neglected and dependent children.

The number of good Christian homes for the care of foster children is growing. More are needed in all sections of the state. Foster homes serve children of all ages and are particularly helpful for some who have special needs. Couples with o without children of their own, who have an abundance of love, find this to be a challenging and rewarding opportunity for Christian service.

Members of the Board of Trustees and members of the staff of the Homes are dedicated to a program of child care that will merit the undivided loyality and support of our people and that will be worthy the blessings of our Lord. We covenant with you to face the future as we have the past; to offer Christian nurture to children in distress in the name of Christ our Savior and Lord.

HOME FOR AGING REPORT

The past year in your Baptist Homes for the Aging has been one of the most eventful in the history of the Homes. Of primary significance was the opening of the Yanceyville Home on November 1, 1967, and dedicatory services on April 25, 1968, with Governor Dan K. Moore as the principal speaker.

When the Yanceyville Home, accomodating 31 residents, is filled to capacity, the number living in all of our Homes will reach 200. Residents at Yanceyville, Resthaven, the Hayes Home, the Hamilton Home and the Infirmary constitute a large and ever-growing family of elderly people who receive compassionate and tender care,

The waiting list for admission to one of our five Homes continues to grow, but has been revised and is a bit more realistic than ever before. The opening of the Yanceyville Home has relieved the pressure greatly on this waiting list, and persons are encouraged to make application from the various sections of our state.

Baptist of North Carolina can be grateful for their record in ministering to the residents in their five Homes for the Aging. Recent reports reveal that our Baptist Homes for the Aging are giving more financial assistance to their needy aging than any other denominational Home in North Carolina. About 85% of the residents ministered unto received assistance through the love gifts of North Carolina Baptist. These love gifts from our Baptist churches come from two main sources; (1) The Special Day Offering, received on the 3rd Sunday of February each year, from which the Homes derive 22 1/2% of their total support; (2) The Cooperative Program from which we receive 12 1/2% of total income. Gifts for 1967 through two sources were at an all time high and amounted to around \$200,000.00. The 1968 Special Day Offering at this time, is reflecting an encouraging increase. Unless these two vital

ources of income are increased considerably, your Baptist Homes cannot be mainained, either on the basis of quality of care, or quanity.

More than in any previous years the ministry of the Homes has been extended eyond the day to day care of the residents to our local churches and communities. xperiences have been shared in more than one Association, in World Mission Conferences, Family Life Conference, High School classes in Family Living, ect.

Life among the residents in the Homes is most interesting, and if one wonders bout activity among those whose age is 80, let him come and see. Let everyone who is contributing to this great area of human need be grateful to the Lord to be a part of a great denomination that has had the vision to plan for the aging, and is noving forward in meeting the needs of this very deserving group.

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

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this association shall be the West Liberty Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose of this association shall be to promote Christian fellowship and cooperation among the churches affiliated with this association; to uphold the doctrines and principles of our Baptist faith and to encourage the churches to be loyal to and practice these doctrines and principles; to promote the preaching and teaching of God's word; the enlisting and training of all Christians for service; to promote missions, benevolences, stewardship, Christian education, and the winning of all men to Christ to the ends of the earth; to cooperate with the North Carolina Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in a world-wide mission program.

ARTICLE III - BAPTIST DOCTRINE

THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE, as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in May, 1925, shall be the Articles of Faith adopted by this body.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

This association shall be composed of messengers from the affiliating churches. When such messengers are elected by the association, they shall be seated and entitled to participate in the affairs of the body. Each church affiliated with this association shall be entitled to three messengers for the first fifty members or fraction thereof, and one additional messenger for every one hundred members or fraction thereof, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this association shall be moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, pianist, song leader, associational missionary, and the head officer of each associational organization. These officers, except the associational missionary, shall be nominated and elected by this association during the irst session of the annual meeting and shall continue to serve until the close of the collowing annual session or until their successors shall be elected and installed.

Section 2. The associational missionary shall be elected as need arises and his tenure of service shall be indefinite.

ARTICLE VI - AUTONOMY, AUTHORITY AND ASSISTANCE

Section 1. This association shall be an autonomous (self-governing) body and therefore reserves the right to determine its own policies and direct its own business. It may refuse to seat messengers who are not in fellowship or doctrinal agreemen with this body, or whose churches are not.

Section 2. As to authority, this body shall never exercise any authority over, o give direction to any church or churches, which are affiliated with it or which have been affiliated with it.

Section 3. As to assistance, this association shall stand ready to lend any assistance or counsel to any church making request for such help.

ARTICLE VII - ORGANIZATIONS

Section 1. This body shall encourage and promote such associational organizations as Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music and such other organizations which are in keeping with the purpose of this association, with their full staffs and programs necessary for the promotion of the work.

Section 2. The officers of these organizations shall be elected by the respective organizations, but these officers must be approved by the association in its annual meeting.

ARTICLE VIII - MEETINGS

Section 1. The association shall hold an annual meeting with a morning, afternoon and evening session on the Thursday following the first Sunday in August. The place of the meeting(s) shall be in one of the affiliating churches.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall have the power to change the starting time and/or place of the annual meeting in case of emergency or necessity.

Section 3. This association shall promote regular meetings of all its organizations and its committees as shall prove most effective for carrying out the total purpose of the association.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Executive Committee:

(a) The Executive Committee shall be composed of the pastor of each of the cooperating churches and one lay member from each cooperating church who is to be elected by the church, heads of the organizations and the officers of the association.

(b) As to meetings, the Executive Committee shall have quarterly meetings. The time, place and date are to be determined by the committee itself.

(c) As to called meetings, none shall be called unless it is absolutely necessary. Called meetings can be called only by the moderator or someone designated by him.

(d) The moderator of the association shall serve as the chairman of the Executive Committee. The vice-moderator shall serve as chairman in event of the absence of the moderator. The clerk of the association shall serve as secretary of the Executive Committee.

(e) The task of the Executive Committee shall be to attend to all matters of the association between annual meetings; promote all progress authorized by the association, and carry out all directives given by the association. It shall make an annual report to the association of all work carried on and all finances handled.

Section 2. Standing Committees:

This association shall have the following Standing Committees, named by the noderator before the close of the annual meeting to serve until the close of the next unual meeting, namely, (a) Program (b) Nominating (c) Missions, Finance, and sudget (d) Credentials and (e) Resolutions.

(a) The Program Committee shall consist of the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk ind two members named by the moderator. This committee shall begin its work in May prior to the annual meeting of the association. The Program Committee shall be responsible for working out a well-rounded program for the annual meeting in which all the work of the association and the denominational interests are fairly epresented and for choosing the preacher and alternate for the annual sermon as well as the speakers it deems necessary. At the annual meeting of the association, he Program Committee will be responsible for such adjustments or changes in the suggested program as becomes necessary for the effective presentation of the work. The vice-moderator, or someone appointed by him, shall always present the program o the messengers of the annual meeting,

(b) The Nominating Committee shall consist of three members who shall make plans to present for nomination at the annual meeting of the association all officers and representatives, except the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk and treasurer, who shall be nominated from the floor. They shall, moreover, receive from the associaional organizations, the names of their officers and place them before the annual neeting of the association for approval or disapproval. This committee shall serve throughout the year, meaning that any time an office of the officers or representatives becomes vacant, it shall present a nomination to the Executive Committee, This committee shall meet in May prior to the annual session in order that it may intelligently do its best and shall meet at such times as is necessary.

(c) The Missions, Budget and Finance Committee shall be composed of the moderator, associational missionary, a pastor, a layman, a laywoman, and a representative from each of the associational organizations. The duty of this committee is to work with the associational missionary in planning and promoting a missions program. Recommendations: This committee shall elect its own chairman and secretary. This committee shall endeavor to lead the churches (1) to adopt and use the best methods of financing, (2) to support associational missions and world missions causes through the Cooperative Program with regular gifts.

(d) The Evangelism Committee shall be composed of three members who are vitally interested in the Southern Baptist Program of Evangelism. This committee shall lead in promoting this program of Evangelism in the association.

(e) The Credentials Committee shall be composed of three members whose duties are as follows:

1. Stand ready to counsel with leaders of any church wishing to affiliate with the association.

2. Examine the application of churches seeking to affiliate with the association,

3. Make the necessary and appropriate recommendations to the association concerning the admission or readmission of a church to the fellowship of the association.

(f) The Resolutions Committee shall be composed of three members. Its duties shall be to bring before this body any necessary resolutions.

Section 3. Other Committees:

The association may have other committees as the need arises or that are deemed necessary by the body. The work of such committees, however, shall in no instance overlap nor conflict with the work of any of the standing committees and its duties

shall be limited to the specific instructions which are to be given it at the time c its appointment.

ARTICLE X - REPRESENTATIVES

This association shall have the following representatives: (1) Memorials, (2 Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aged, (4) Baptist Hospitals, (5) Chris tian Education, (6) State Missions, (7) Cooperative Program, (8) Christian Action League, and others that may become necessary.

The representative of Memorials shall be responsible for preparing a brie memorial service to be given at the annual meeting.

All other representatives shall have as their primary concern and responsibilit that of truly representing their respective agency or cause and give a report to the annual meeting of the association.

ARTICLE XI - AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any meeting of the association by a major ity vote of the messengers present, provided notice of such a change has been give at the morning session and voted upon at the night session.

SUPPLEMENT

1. In parliamentary procedure, this body shall be governed by ROBERT'S RULES O ORDER.

2. The fiscal year of this association shall be from the first day of August to the last day of July, inclusive. Annual reports to the association shall cover this period

3. All officers of the association must be members of churches affiliated with this association, in good standing and recognized for their knowledge of and loyalt to Southern Baptist doctrines and programs.

4. The duties of the officers shall be as follows:

THE MODERATOR shall call to order and preside over the meetings of the asso ciation and the Executive Committee. He shall view and direct the affairs of th association in an orderly manner and Christian spirit. He may ask other officers an members of the body to preside if necessary.

THE VICE-MODERATOR may, if the moderator so directs, preside over the as sociational meetings. He shall preside at all meetings in the absence of the mod erator. He shall assist the moderator in such ways as the moderator may direct

THE CLERK shall keep a full and accurate record of all business of the association and the Executive Committee. At each meeting, he shall be prepared to give al minutes of the previous meeting, All records shall be kept in a safe place. He shal publish the minutes of the association.

THE TREASURER shall receive all funds of and for the association, and shall dis burse all funds in accordance with the adopted associational budget or the specifie instructions of the association or the Executive Committee. He shall keep accurat records of all moneys received, with sources and designations of same. He shall make reports to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee and the annua meeting of the association of all receipts and expenditures.

THE PIANIST shall play the instrument at the annual meeting and all calle meetings. He or she will cooperate with the Program Committee.

THE SONG LEADER shall lead the singing at the annual meeting. He or she shal cooperate with the Program Committee.

THE HISTORIAN shall write in orderly form the events of the association, beginning with its organization. The association should request the churches and inlividuals who may possess historical information about the association to make it accessible to the historian. He shall make record of current events of each fiscal rear and read his annual chapter to the annual meeting of the association for adoption. These records shall be kept in a safe place.

THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY shall reveal a vital concern for all the work of the association. Much of his work will be in advisory capacity. He shall promote he progress of the denomination. He shall be a servant and not a master. He shall be an ex-officio member of all committees. He shall hold no office in the associaion or any of its organizations other than that of associational missionary. He shall be an understanding friend to pastors, officers of the association, and people in the association and churches at large.

THE HEADS OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS shall use the latest nethods and plans of Southern Baptists in the formulation of their work and lead their rganizations to serve and help the churches.

5. All associational organizations and regular committees shall make reports to he regular meetings of the Executive Committee and/or to the association. The Executive Committee shall exercise authority over these organizations and comnittees only to the extent of determining whether they are working within the bounds of the organizational programs as approved by the association.

6. A place shall be made in the order of business of the annual meeting of the association for miscellaneous business in the morning and afternoon.

7. Messengers to the association shall be accorded equal rights and privileges of the floor, provided each messenger who desires to speak shall rise and address the moderator and be recognized before he speaks. No messenger shall be entitled to speak on any subject more than twice until other messengers desiring to speak have been heard. Upon request of a messenger, or by consent of the body, the moderator may invite a visitor to speak during a discussion.

8. An affiliating church shall be one that is intimately in association and harmony with the purpose and doctrine of this association.

9. An association means a body of persons organized with a cooperative purpose in view.

10. As to the matter of the relation of churches to this association, churches do not join or become members of this association. If they did, they would become subject to the direction and authority of this association. Churches do, however, voluntarily affiliate in fellowship and in cooperation with other churches of this association. This association is made up of individual messengers from the churches affiliated with this association, and their action in sessions of the association in no way binds or obligates the churches. Each Baptist body is always sovereign ithin itself and never gives or receives directives from another body, although it may seek counsel from other bodies. Therefore, this association does not exclude a church from its fellowship or deal with it as a body for any cause. However, this association does have the authority to determine what churches shall be affiliated with it by reason of its power to seat, or refuse to seat, the messengers from a church not in harmony or fellowship, by doctrine and practice, with this association.

On the invitation of a church, this association may send a committee or committees into a church, for discussion only. If reports of unfaithfulness or disloyalty comes to the knowledge of the association, it may ask the Credentials Committee to inquire and report to the association. **11.** Each church affiliated with this association shall send a full account of all work done during the year to the clerk of the association on a form provided by the clerk at least ten days before the annual meeting of the association,

12. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the Executive Committee. 13. This supplement to the constitution may be amended at any regular annual meeting of the association by a majority of the messengers present, provided notice of such a change has been given at the morning session and voted upon at the night session of the annual meeting.

HISTORIANS REPORT

The first Baptist Mission to be established in this section of the state was founde by the Baptist Church of Philadelphia. It was placed in charge of Rev. Evans Jones who translated the New Testament into the Cherokee language. About 1820, Rev Humphery Posey was appointed by the Mission Board of Philadelphia to take charge This Mission was located on what is known as the Mission Farm and was the beginning of Baptist Christian work in this section under the missionary endeavor: of the Rev. Humphery Posey.

The first association to be organized in this section of the country was the Valler River Association. It was constituted in 1839 of churches from Swain, Graham and Cherokee Counties. The three churches from Cherokee County were Murphy, Valley River and Valley Town. The Murphy church was granted a letter of dismission in 1871. (Minutes of Valley River Association, 1871.) James Whitaker, Sr. was elected moderator of this association for the years 1862-63. (Memoir of James Whitaker, Sr.)

A. Ammons served as Moderator of the Valley River Association from 1870 to 1874 and James Whitaker, Jr. served as clerk in 1870-1871. J.M. Thomasson served as clerk in 1874. (Minutes of the Valley River Association 1870, 1871, 1874.)

May I pause here a moment to pay tribute to these pioneer leaders. We can be justly proud of men like James Whitaker, Humphery Posey, Elisha Hedden, Alfred Corn, James and Elisha Kimsey, (Grandfather and great uncle of George W. Truett) and of a later period, Dr. George W. Truett, Ford McConnell, John T. Plotte and A.B. Smith. No man ever held the barner of Christ higher than these pioneer preachers of our mountain country. The candle they lighted still burns brightly and I am persuaded that darkness shall never put it out. These men preached the gospel so powerfully and so convincingly that their influence was felt in much of Western North Carolina and North Georgia, and as a result of their faith and zeal, a Baptist Church was organized in every town and village and almost every rural community in this section.

The Western North Carolina Baptist Association was organized in the Tusquittee Church in 1884. It was constituted of some 12 to 15 churches from the Hiawassee, Notla River, West Liberty, and Valley River Associations. In the 1897 minutes of the Western North Carolina Baptist Association, meeting with the Hangingdog, Baptist Church, churches as follows are listed: Peachtree, Marble Springs, Valley River, Hangingdog, Mt. Pisgah, Hayesville, Nantahala, Bethesda, Little Brasstown, Fires Creek, Tusquittee, Shiloh, Mt. Pleasant, Bethel, Bellview, Pine Log, Red Marble, Philadelphia and Martins Creek.

The fiftieth of **''Jubilee''** session of the Western North Carolina Baptist Association was held with the Tusquittee Baptist Church August 21, 22, 1934. Our association is now composed of 50 churches, 31 of these from Cherokee County, 17 from Clay, 1 from Macon and 1 from Swain.

The first organized associational missionary work was begun in Western North Carolina Association during the year of 1943, when the Association called Rev. Lane Akins to give half-time to the Associational missionary work in cooperation with the churches in a program of enlistment, training, promoting, praying and evangelizing. During the first year in this new field of work, 12 Vacation Bible Schools were held, a study courses were taught and the worker assisted in all phases of church and tenominational work. In 1945, Rev. Akins was called as chaplain by our military orces.

Miss Mildred Whitfield was called to succeed Rev. Akins and gave freely of her ime and talent to the service of the Master during her stay. Miss Ruth Bagwell ollowed Miss Whitfield and held Bible Schools in more than 35 churches in the association during her first year. She was succeeded by Rev. A.G. Brooks in 1952. Rev. G.E. Scruggs was called in 1953. The missionary program has grown by leaps and bounds. Rev. Scruggs and family have given unlimited time to the program and preat progress has been made in various phases of church and associational work.

A home was completed for the associational worker in 1954 at a cost of \$4,577.00. According to the 1897 minutes of this association, the churches paid a total of 400.00 to pastor's salaries. In 1956 - \$38,064.00.

Paid to orphanage in 1897 - \$16.25. In 1956 - \$2,693.00.

Total amount for missions in 1897 - \$100.16. In 1956 - \$22,740.00.

There were nine ordained ministers in the association in 1897. There were 67 in .956. Baptisms in 1897 - 63; in 1956 - 150.

We have no record available of the early moderators and clerks of the association. ev. John T. Plotte was in the organization of the Western North Carolina Associaion in the Tusquittee Church in 1884 and attended every session of the association nd served as moderator of that body from 1893 until his death in 1918, a period of 5 years. Other moderators were as follows: Rev. C.F. Martin, Rev. C.F. Rogers, ev. W.F. Sinclair, Rev. J.L. Underwood, Rev. Robert Barker, Rev. Paul Lovingood, ev. Algie West, Peyton Ivie, Rev. A.B. Lovell, Rev. J. Alton Morris and Lloyd lendrix.

The later clerks of the association were as follows: George W. Kimsey, J.H. Jarwood, George F. Hendrix, Rev. T.L. Sasser, W.A. West, Clarence Hendrix, Charles Carringer, Rev. Lester Stowe, Frank Walsh and Marvin Hampton.

This report should be a challenge to our people today to go into God's vineyard to york. "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest."

The above History was printed in the 1957 W.N.C. Baptist Assoc. minutes. Twelve ears have brought about many happenings to this Association. Brother Scruggs hoved away and Brother J.G. Miller replaced him as missionary for two years. In 960, Rev. Elmer Greene took up this post and served faithfully until his untimely eath in Feb., 1964. Brother Greene will long be remembered for the great work he id for the Lord in Western North Carolina. Rev. Fred Lunsford was called by the ssociation in 1964 to serve as missionary and is still serving in this capacity. ev. Lunsford was instrumental in the work of combining the West Liberty and W.N.C. aptist Associations into the Truett Association which will become effective in August, 1970. The Association has set up an office in Murphy and employs a par time secretary. Last year (1968), the Missionary drove some 23,000 miles to preach teach, attend meetings, conferences and revivals and the office handled some 9,00 pieces of mail. This alone will verify the fact that the Association has progresse much in the past several years.

Looking back through the years since 1957, we find these people serving a clerks of the Association: Marvin Hampton, Lester Stowe, Clarence Hendrix, Dori Raxter, Hoyt Lunsford, Lenora Martin, and Betty Ingram. Those who have served a moderators are: Lloyd Hendrix, Marvin Hampton, Fred Lunsford, Jimmy Rogers, Thoma. Christmas, Jesse Bailey, and J.W. Bargiol.

With sadness, we mention a few of those who have passed on who meant so much to the work of the Lord in this association. Among these are J. Alton Morris, Ton Truett, L.P. Smith, R.C. Shearin, and Elmer Greene.

One of our mountain ministers, Rev. Don Turner who served as pastor of Truet Memorial Church in Hayesville for a number of years, is now serving as a foreign missionary to Brazil. Don's going from us to be a missionary recalls to us the mess sage God gave us when he said, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Surely God has been with us here in the W.N.C and West Liberty Baptist Associations in a very special way.

INFLATIONARY TREND CONTINUES

During 1968, neither inflation nor the economy showed any evidence of a slo down. Even as late as the second quarter of 1969, there was no sign of a levelin off by the inflationary trend. The cost of living rose 4.7% pushing the Consumer Pric Index to a record 123.7 in Dec., 1968. This was the greatest increase since 1951

This inflationary trend continued to affect the buying power of every one, includ ing the retired.

To meet the needs of retiring ministers, church staff members and denomina tional employees, the Annuity Board has developed the Southern Baptist Protectio Program to provide an adequate retirement income. As the inflationary trend con tinues, many churches and agencies are upgrading their retirement programs b contributing 10% of total salary. The Annuity Board and state conventions heartil recommend this action.

Response to the three-plan Protection Program was good during 1968. The Program includes: Plan "A," the basic retirement fund; Plan "B," the supplementary fund and Plan "C," the variable fund. Response was also good in the Life and Health Benefit Plans.

- 3. 18,086 churches providing protection for their pastors

7. 3,106 applications for Health Benefit Plan, 1,677 net gain

8. 790 applications for Life Benefit Plan, 134 net gain

THIRD YEAR FOR "13TH CHECK"

For the third consecutive year, the Annuity Board issued a "13th check" to all ecipients of life retirement benefits. The extra check, amounting to 12% of each erson's annual benefit, was made possible by interest earnings in excess of the mount necessary to pay the retirement benefits. The excess earnings are distributed o plans of active members as well as to retired persons.

A Report To The Western North Carolina-West Liberty Associations on:

BROYHILL HOME FOR CHILDREN Waynesville-Clyde, N.C.

The dream to establish a home for Children in Western North Carolina is becoming a reality. A ground breaking ceremony was held on the site, April 26, 1969. Construction on the first two cottages is expected to begin soon.

Encouraging support is being given the Campaign to secure \$634,000.00 to build this home. Gifts have been received from many persons, institutions, Sunday School Classes, groups, and churches. The last report shows \$445,609.63 has been made in pledges and cash. The wonderful way the people of Western North Carolina are giving shows the keen interest they have in providing a Child Care Center in our area of the state.

We are grateful for the contributions from individual people, churches, classes and industries in Cherokee and Clay Counties. The pledges and cash continue to come in from over this area. We are glad to report \$33,460.45 has been received.

In order to complete all the buildings planned, over \$185,000.00 more is needed. The invitation to have a part in this effort must be continued. Though good progress is being made, we should keep up the emphasis.

Many people are becoming interested in the Memorial Gift plan of giving. Under this plan a gift may be made to furnish a room, a cottage, or to buy some equipment in honor of a relative or friend. An entire cottage may be furnished for \$12,500.00, a bedroom for \$600. A water cooler may be purchased for \$125.00. These are only some of the things that may be furnished. Further information will be given upon request.

Jesus said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my prethren, ye have done it unto Me." Matthew 25:40. The Broyhill Home is a fine opportunity for us to provide the Christian care needed by many children in our section of the state.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Among church supported agencies, North Carolina Baptists are fortunate to have one of the finest programs in the nation for the care and development of dependent children and for strengthening and supporting family life. This is an application of the teaching and example of Christ in His earthly ministry. More than 1,200 Children and their families are served annually.

The Children's Homes, through a variety of quality services, is recognized as a family service agency. This is made possible by well trained and professional staff who provide leadership for group care programs, foster home care, family services, consultation with churches in preschool programs and planning for higher education of children who have been in care. This program unfolds on six campuses and through the work of regional casework centers throughout the state.

More requests for services are now coming to the Baptist Children's Homes than at any time in our previous history. All agency beds are filled and all available money is being utilized. We, too, have been caught in the rising costs of living and in an inflationary economy. A wider variety of quality services are being demanded to meet the needs of children who are the products of today's complex society. Present economic conditions make it necessary to have additional operating income with which to maintain the current program before any further expansion of services can be considered.

Friends of the Children's Homes, in Western North Carolina, have responded generously to the Founders and Builders Program to raise funds with which to establish the Broyhill Home to serve children in Western North Carolina. Sufficient funds have been given and pledged to purchase the land, to prepare the site and to construct the first two cottages for children. When the campus has been completed provisions will have been made for four cottages for children, a multi-purpose administration and activities building and a home for the superintendent. With the support and cooperation of Baptists and other friends of the Homes another ministry is being developed in Asheville. A home in which to serve unwed mothers and their offspring will be opened during the fall of 1969.

By the use of designated gifts and bequests from individuals and families, significant progress is being made in the long-range plans for upgrading of facilities. Two cottages are now under construction at Mills Home. A recreation building and an infirmary at Kennedy Home and two cottages for children at the Broyhill Home are scheduled for construction next year.

The contribution of our Baptist people through the Cooperative Program, the Thanksgiving Offering and special gifts are essential to our continued operation and are received with deep appreciation. An increasing number of friends are finding a rewarding stewardship opportunity through the establishment of trusts for the Homes and by means of wills and estate planning for the needs of dependent children. Members of the staff are available for consultation in estate planning and the preparation of wills.

The Lord, who is a charge of the weather and in charge of the Baptist Homes for the Aging, has surely ewarded our faith and moved upon our Baptist people to see the urgency of our needs, nd we are grateful.

Ours shall continue to be a relationship of trust in the Lord and faith in our Baptist eople. We earnestly hope that a continued and sustained effort will be made by our hurches to increase and strengthen the amount of the two main means of support or our ministry to the Aging--the Special Offering, and the Cooperative Program. Since last year, the Yanceyville Home, our newest Home, has been filled capacity, and we now have almost 200 deserving older men and women living in c midst there and in our other four Homes--Resthaven, and Hayes Home, in Winsto Salem, the Albemarle Home, in Albemarle, and the Hamilton Home, in Hamiltc These wonderful people are finding much happiness in Christian companionship wi persons of their age group, and great security in knowing that they will be loved as cared for in sickness as well as in health.

It is a deeply rewarding experience to see the light and joy of Christ on an old person's face and to hear words of deep appreciation almost daily for the Christia love and nurture that North Carolina Baptists are making possible through this min istry. We believe, therefore, that our Baptist people will want to have an ever-in creasing part in so worthy a labor of love in the Master's Name. We know that the Lord will not fail us, and we also believe that our people will want to be as faithff as possible.
