The Introductory Sermon was delivered by Elder Burwell Temple, from 5th John, 3rd chapter, and part of the 1st verse—"Behold what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God!"

The Association then met according to adjournment.

- 1. Chose Burwell Temple Moderator.
- 2. Chose Elder J. H. Kennedy clerk, and Henry Avry assistant.
- 3. Corresponding Messengers from sister Associations were called for, and invited to seats—whereupon Elder Humphrey Stallings and W. Sands, from the Kehukee Association; Elder Azel Peacock, Peter Ryla, and Thompson Craven, from Abbott's Creek Union Association; Elder Benjamin Bynum, from Contentnea Association; Elder Willis Wells, James Wilder, Durham Hall, James Smith, Thos. Lattey, and Jesse Parker, from Country Line Association; and Samuel Hould, from White Oak Association, all came forward, took seats with us, and presented sundry copies of their Minutes.
- 4. Appointed Bro, R. N. Gully and John Boon a Committee of Finance.
- 5. Corresponding Letters from Churches composing this Association, were called for, and noted as follows:

Gulley.—

To Contentnea Association: James K. Barber and Moore Stephenson. To Abbott's Creek Association: Elders George Nance, Burwell Temple, and R. M. Gulley. Also appointed Elders Jesse Adams and Burwell Temple to attend Contentnea Association, for 1841.

The Counties, times, and Meeting Houses, of the above named Associations, were given as follows: The Kehukee Association, Edg-combe county, commencing on Saturday before the first Sunday in October, 1841, with the church at Little Conetor. The Country Line Association, Orange county, commencing on Saturday before the third Sunday in August, 1841, with the church at Harmony. The Abbott's Creek Association, Randolph county, commencing on Saturday before the fourth Sunday in August, 1841, with the church at Brush Creek. The White Oak Association, Duplin county, commencing on Saturday before the second Sunday in October, 1841, with the church at Muddy Creek.

- 9. The committee appointed to examine the Circular Letter, reported and was discharged. The Letter was read, received, and ordered to be annexed to these Minutes.
- 10. Appointed our next Association to be holden with the church at Cedar Grove, Wake county, commencing on Friday before the third Sunday in October, 1841.
- 11. Appointed Elder James Wilson to preach the Introductory Sermon, and Elder John H. Kenady his alternate. Worship to commence at 11 o'clock.
- 12. Appointed Elder James Wilson to write our next Circular Letter, and chose his subject.
- 13. The query from Cedar Grove Church, presented to our last Association and referred to this, was withdrawn by the delegation from that church.
 - 14. Appointed brethren to occupy the stand on Lord's Day, viz:

Elders Willis Wells. Humphrey Stallings, and James Wilder. Worship to commence at 10 o'clock.

15. Appointed Burwell Temple to transcribe and superintend the printing of these Minutes, (400 copies,) and ordered that he be allowed for his services \$7 00.

16. Adjourned, to time and place above mentioned, with prayer by Elder Azel Peacock.

The brethren appointed to preach on Sunday, met a large and respectable congregation. Elder Wells introduced the service of the day, from John, ch. 14, v. 27—"Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." Elder Stallings followed, from first John, ch. 3, v. 1—"Behold what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God!"—Elder Wilder concluded, from John, ch. 11, the latter clause of v. 28—"The Master is come, and calleth for thee."

We pray that a blessing may attend the labors of the day.

CIRCULAR LETTER,

TO THE BRETHREN AND SISTERS OF THE CHURCHES COMPOSING THE LITTLE RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Dear Brethren: According to the usual custom, you no doubt are expecting an Epistle from us, more particular to your religious edification in these cold trying times, through which the Church of God is passing; and we know of none of more importance than that treated of in first John, ch. 3, v. 1—"Behold what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God!"— Here, you will observe, the Holy Ghost, through the Apostle, addresses us with a note of attention. Behold—look at it—consider it—compare it with all other love, and see how far it excels it in its existence, it powers, its duration, and in its blessed effects upon sinners! First we will notice this Love—what it is. In a word, it is God. God is love—of course its existence is from everlasting. "I have loved thee with an everlasting love." Then this love is to be understood as existing before the world was, as the Savior of sinners hath said: "And thou lovest them as thou hast loved me, and thou lovest me before the world was." So, dear brethren, you see you were loved of God before the world was; and as this love is everlasting, it will never change.— "I am the Lord-I change not."-No, not even when his children are children of wrath, as others. "But God commendeth his love towards us, in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us." But the objector will say, How can God love us while in our sins, as he cannot look upon sin with the least allowance? To this we answer, in Christ and no where else—in Christ, yes, according as "he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world," &c. "But God, who is rich in mercy for his great love wherewith he loved us, even when we were dead in sins," &c.

Thus, brethren, you were loved in Christ—saved in Christ by the blood of the Everlasting Covenant; Christ as a lamb slain for you, considered in the covenant of peace, which was between them both. In this covenant all the sins of Christ's people were cancelled, or made Christ's, to whom justice turned its eye for satisfaction; to the Son of God, who has done according to covenant understanding; and through this channel love, mercy, truth, righteoneness. &c. can flow into the

sinner's soul, and his train fill the Temple. Well may it be said, brethren, "Behold what manner of love the Father bath bestowed on us!" O, brethren, it is a source of solid comfort to those that have eyes to see: when we further reflect, that the rich arrangement of wisdom was all done without any foreseen merit in us as the reason why. This manner of love far surpasses any human reason; but we only have to say that before the children were yet born, neither having done good or evil. "Jacob have I loved, but Esau have I hated." Thus we may exclaim, "O, the depth of the wisdom and knowledge of God," and power and nature of this love; it is stronger than death, Brethien; for hear the Savior: "And I lay down my life for the sheep." O, love, when we look at the ploughers making long their furrows in the dear flesh of Jesus; when we look to that dear head of his and see a platted crown of thorns piercing it; when we look to those dear hands of his, and view the nails rushed through, fastening to the tree of the cross; likewise his feet-do you hear this love say I faint, I can't go further? No. You hear it, after the resurrection, "O, death, where is thy sting? O, grave, where is thy victory?"

The Lord Jesus Christ is our love, and the Church is his love.— Our love has arisen and ascended at the right hand of the Father, and is making intercession for us, according to the will of God. "I have (says Christ) compared thee, O, my love, to a company of horses in Pharoah's chariot;" and says the Church: "As the lillies among thorns, so is my love among the daughters." Thus God's love is the Church, and the Churches love is God—then, "behold what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us!"

This love differs from all other loves. First: because there is no first cause assigned us further than I have loved thee with an everlasting love; but on the Churches part, there is a cause—we love God because he first loved us. All other loves have a cause; Adam's love to Eve is because she is bone of his bone; and God gave her him as a helpmate; all loves that have a first cause have a last end. But the love of God has no end; it is immaterial how dear a husband and wife may be to each other, it ends in death. But the love of God bestowed on us, is not so. There is much lucrative love which may be turned into hatred, and is as cruel as the grave; but God's love is different from this; whom he loves, he loves unto the end; and instead of its being removed for transgression, he chastises and yet loves; it is the love of God breaks the heart of stone; it is this love that draws the soul to him; his righteousness and people in love, which presents holiness

beautiful and desirable; which causes it to hunger and thirst after it; it is this love in the morning of your deliverance that made you rejoice with joy inexpressible and full of glory; it is this love of God that faith worked by, that made all things new; it was this love that made you love the brethren. We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren; and it was this love that made you love poor sinners; and in fact it made Jesus Christ altogether lovely and the chiefest among ten thousands; it is this love that enables you to bear one another's burdens; and it is this love that draws us to keep God's commandments. The nature of it, is not to puff up; it thinketh no evil, or intends no evil; but it loves your enemies; it bears long; indeed it is the fulfilling of the law. O. then what manner of love; there is none to be compared to it: it can make a broken heart whole; the lame to take up his bed and walk; yea, it being applied to a soul, can make a sick body feel well; yea, it can cause all the sorrows of a troubled breast to cease, and the soul in a state of sweet tranquility in a moment; it is this love that will abide forever, will never leave nor forsake. For I am persuaded that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord. This love (God) is in you, and greater is he that is in you and for you than he that is against you. So then, brethren, you are kept by the powers of God; it is this love, brethren, that opened the windows of Heaven and showed Stephen, Jesus at the right hand of God; and likewise you, when you come to die, the power of it can welcome death, having the pleasing prospects of eternal life; just before, can cause you to lean your head on Jesus' breast, and breathe your life out sweetly there. It was this love that enabled the Saints of old to bear the fire, gibbits, and death in various forms. We may say, in conclusion, with the Queen of Sheba, "the half has not been told you." Suffice it to say, in the language of the text, "behold what manner of love the Father hath bestowed on us, that we should be called the sons of God." Yes, this love will live when death itself is dead; you will go into Heaven with it, and there to behold its glory, its beauty, and live in the sweet enjoyment of that rest that remains for the people of God; there you will not only be called the sons of God, but be heirs of God, and joint heirs with Christ Jesus our Lord, for ever and ever; to hear no more the voice of your oppressors; and sorrow and sighing shall flee away; and sing in the sweet embrace, the new song, the song of Moses and the Lamb.

MINUTES

OF THE

LITTLE RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION,

Held with the Church at Beulah M. H., Johnston Co., N. C., on the 27th, 28th and 29th of Sept. 1861.

The introductory sermon was delivered by Elder Josiah Coats, from Romans, 8th chap. 14th verse—"for as many as are led by the spirit of God, they are the sons of God."

2. After a short recess, the brethren came together, and, after praise and prayer by Elder J. H. Kenneday, the Association was organized by appoining Elder J. H. Kenneday Moderator, and James Wilson, Clerk, who called to his assistance, R. N. Gully.

3. Appointed Eld. M. Stephenson and E. Stuart a Com-

mittee of Finance.

4. Called for corresponding and visiting brethren from sister Associations—the following brethren being present, seated themselves: Eld. Shadrach Pate, and Elders P. Mewbern and T. W. Wells, and brother Lemuel S. Hardie, visitants; from White Oak, Eld. Aaron Davis and Jerry W. Yopp; from Kehukee, brother C. A. Scott; Eld. Edward B. Musgrove, from Tennessee, visitant.

5. Letters from the several Churches composing this Association were called for, handed in, read, and their contents

noted in the table of Churches. (See table.)

6. Proceeded to appoint corresponding messengers to sister Associations. To Country Line, Elder James Wilson and Eldridge Stewart; to White Oak, Elders J. H. Kenneday and Josiah Coats; to Kehukee. by letter, and minutes; to

Abbott's Creek, Fisher's River, Mayo and Stannton River, by minutes.

7. Appointed Eld. J. H. Kenneday to write corresponding

letters to Kehukee and Contentnea.

8. Called for a Circular Letter, and one being present, Elders B. Temple, J. H. Kenneday and James Wilson were appointed a Committee of Examination.

9. Brethren appointed to correspond with sister Associations called on to report. Some attended, and those who did

not were excused.

10. Appointed our next Association to be held with the Church at Juniper M. H., Johnston county, N. C., to commence on Friday before the last Sunday in September, 1862; Eld. J. H. Kenneday to preach the introductory sermon, and James Wilson his alternate; worship to commence at 11 o'clock. Adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.—Praise and benediction by Eld. A. Davis.

SATURDAY MORNING, 10 o'clock.

11. The Association met according to adjournment. Praise and prayer by Elder A. Davis.

12. Again invited corresponding messengers. No more

present.

13. Called the names of delegates and marked the ab-

14. The Committee of Finance called on to report. The Committee reported that they find on hand from last year, \$9 80 Received from the Churches this year, 18 25

15. The Committee of Examination called on to report.

Committee reported that they had examined the Circular

Committee reported that they had examined the Circular, and recommend its reading in the Association. Letter read, received, and ordered to be annexed to these minutes, and Committee discharged.

16. Appointed James Wilson to transcribe these minutes, have 700 copies printed and distribute them as usual; have

one copy entered on our record, and that he be allowed \$10 for his services; send 43 copies to Kehukee, 28 to Country Line, 36 to Contentnea, 24 to White Oak, 18 to Abbott's Creek, 18 to Fisher's River, 20 to Mayo, and 20 to Stanton's River.

17. The Churches of this Association are arranged as follows, for the purpose of holding section meetings: Section 1st, Cedar Grove, Salem, Neuse, Bethel, Beulah and Contentnea; Section 2d, Cross-Roads, Union, Juniper, Mill Branch and Simpson's Creek; Section 3d, Seven Miles, Reedy Prong, Hannah's Creek, Black River and New Hope; Section 4th, Fellowship, Rehoboth, Middle Creek, Sandy Grove and Wil-

low Spring.

18. Proceeded to appoint section meetings as follows: one in the 3d section, at Reedy Prong, on the 4th Sunday and day before, in Nov., 1861, Elds. J. H. Kenneday and James Wilson to attend; one in the 4th section, at Sandy Grove, on the 3d Sunday and day before, in Aug., 1862, Elds. J. H. Kenneday and J. H. Sasser to attend; one in the 1st section, at Neuse, on the 3d Sunday and day before, in April, 1862, Elds. J. H. Kenneday and James Wilson to attend.

19. Brethren appointed to attend section meetings last year called on to report. Some attended, and those who did

not were excused.

20. Appointed Eld. J. H. Kenneday to write a Circular

Letter for next year.

21. Appointed preachers to occupy the stand to-morrow, as follows: Elders Aaron Davis, Parrott Mewbern and Edward B. Musgrove. Worship to commence at 10 o'clock. Agreed that the minutes be sent to Mill Branch and Simpson's Creek by mail, post-paid by the Association.

Adjourned to time and place. Praise and prayer by Eld.

B. Temple.

J. H. KENNEDAY, Moderator.

JAMES WILSON, Clerk.

SUNDAY MORNING, 10 o'clock.

The brethren appointed to occupy the stand to-day attended, (Eld. Mewbern being unwell did not preach.) Eld. A. Davis introduced the services, and preached from Gal., 4th chap. 6th verse, "And because ye are sons God hath sent

forth the spirit of His Son into your hearts, crying Abba, Father." Eld. Musgrove followed, and preached from John, 3d chap. and part of the 9th verse, "How can these things be?" Eld. Temple preached from Jer., 15th ch. 19th verse, "Therefore, thus saith the Lord, if thou return, then will I bring thee again, and thou shalt stand before me; and if thou take forth the precious from the vile, thou shalt be as my mouth: let them return unto thee; but return not thou unto them." Eld. Kenneday concluded with an exhortation. The congregation was large and very attentive (in part)—we hope a divine blessing may be added.

CIRCULAR.

The Elders and Messengers of the Little River Baptist Association, to all whom they represent:

DEAR BRETHREN IN THE LORD: We are once more permitted to address you by this our. Annual Circular. The day in which we live is pregnant with many things which are calculated to mar the peace and happiness of Zion, and we have thought proper to call your attention to a few of them. From the days of Cain, who killed his brother Abel, on down to the present period of time, we find that the world, the flesh and the devil, have always stood in battle array against the "spiritual Israel, or heirs of promise." If we take a retrospective view of the opposition and affliction that the people of God have had to encounter in every age that is past, are we not ready to inquire, why is it that the peculiar people of God have not long since become extinct? They have had to pass through the fiery furnace, the lion's den, the hands of wicked men, the rage of devils, the mock of Ishmaelites, and last, (but not least,) they have had to contend with a malignant and inveterate foe, known by the name of "the old man." Dear brethren, the cause why Zion has not fallen to rise no more, is clearly revealed in the scriptures of eternal truth, and it will be well for us all to be very intimate with those scriptures, in this day of darkness and delusion, whilst many are crying "lo here, and lo there." is a religion which may truly be called the religion of this world—and the advocates or abettors of this religion have, in every age, been the most violent opposers of the religion of the meek and lowly Jesus. In the days of the incarnation of our highly exalted Prince and Saviour, this religion seemed to be in a prosperous condition; and, indeed, its prosperity has always consisted in bloody persecution of, or slanderous reports against, the Lord Jesus Christ, and the members of his mystical body. But, perhaps, no age of the world surpasses the present in zeal, in untiring efforts and in numbers, for the upbuilding and extension of the kingdom of anti-Christ. But, "Fear not little flock, for it is your Father's

good pleasure to give you the Kingdom." It is slanderously reported, and some affirm that those who preach the doctrine of sovereign grace do not preach the doctrine of repentance, nor exhort sinners to flee the wrath to come. But those who make the aforesaid charges, labor under an awful mistake, in supposing that it is the non-professing part of the community who are the greatest enemies to God, and to his people; and, therefore, should be addressed by the Ministers as such alone. Who did the apostles of old exhort to repent of their wicked ways? and against whom were the threatenings of Heaven made? Was it not the idolatrons Jews, but more especially their preachers? Of whom did John the Baptist speak, when he said, "O, generation of vipers, who hath warned you to flee the wrath to come?" Was it non-professors? Unto whom was Jesus Christ preaching, when He said, "Ye serpents, ye generation of vipers, how can ye escape the damnation of hell?" Of whom did Christ say to his disciples "beware?" Was it publicans and sinners, and their perni-· cious practices, or rather, was it not those who "compassed sea and land to make one proselyte," and for pretence make long prayers, and devour widow's houses? If then the prophets of old, John the Baptist, and Jesus Christ, the Lord of glory were not mistaken, (and we firmly believe they were not,) then the old fashioned Baptist preachers are not far from being right, when they call upon the self-righteous to repent of their wicked course in teaching for doctrines the commandments of men, and warn them of the awful consequences of fighting against the sovereignty of Jehovah.

Dear brethren, we exhort you to contend earnestly for the truth, for error, like a flood, is spreading far and wide over our otherwise once happy land. Satan has long been mustering his wicked forces, and endeavoring to sow seeds of discord among the followers of Emanuel. The world also is inviting you to partake largely of its vanities, so that you may not find time to go to the house of God, nor feel engaged for the prosperity of Zion. Light is called darkness and darkness light, law is called gospel and the gospel law. The world is called the church of Christ, and the members of the church of Christ are called Antinomians. In the language of an apostle we would say, "Take unto you the whole armor of God." Yes, brethren, be certain that you are clad in the panoply of Heaven, and then go forth to the glorious war, for "One shall chase a thousand, and two shall put ten thousand to flight." "No weapon that is formed against

thee shall prosper, and every tongue that shall rise in judge ment against thee thou shalt condemn." Although Zion appears at present to be under a dark cloud, a long wintry season has overtaken her, and the enemies of the cross are saying unto her, "Where is thy God?" Yet, brethren, let us remember the admonition of the apostle Paul. "Stand fast, therefore, in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free," "for the Lord will not forsake his people for his great name's sake, because it hath pleased the Lord to make you his people." I Sam. 12th chap. 22d verse. How cheering the thought that Jesus Christ is the Captain of our salvation, and that He has gone before His feeble followers, and having met and conquered. "Let not your hearts be troubled," "for I am persuaded that neither death nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present nor things to come, nor height nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Dear brethren, as we are not our own, but are bought with a price, and called with a holy calling, let us endeavor to adorn the doctrine of God our Saviour, by a godly conversation and an upright walk before the world, and by acting in a plain, honest and faithful manner among ourselves, and in

the church of God.

"Now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and forever. Amen."

Adjourned until Saturday morning 10 o'clock a.m. Benedic-

tion by the Moderator.

SATURDAY MORNING.

16th. Met according to adjournment, praise and prayer by

Elder James Cavenaugh.

17th. Again called for corresponding and visiting brethren, when Brethren Calvin Atkinson and C. Hooks came forward and took seats with us.

18th. The Committee on Finance called on to report; the Com-

19th. Appointed Elder J. A. T. Jones to transcribe and superintend the printing of these Minutes, have 1062 copies printed, and distribute them as best he can; enter them on our record; send 50 copies to Kehukee, 35 to Country Line, 40 to Contentnea, 30 to White Oak, 20 to Abbott's Creek, 20 to Fishers River, 20 to Staunton River, 20 to Mayo, 20 to Mill Branch, 25 to S. C. P. B. Association, 20 to Black Creek, 20 to Seven Mile, 15 to Toisnot, 20 to Eno, and that he be allowed \$12 for his service.

20th. Appointed preachers to preach to-morrow: Elders Jas. S. Dameron, T. B. Lancaster, Isaac Jones and L. I. Bodenhamer.

21st. Then agreed that this Association extend thanks to the brethren and friends of the surrounding community for their hospitality in supporting the Association.

Then adjourned until Sunday morning 10 o'clock a. m. Praise
