PROCEEDINGS

Bessemer City.

The third annual session of the Woman's Missionary Union of the Gaston County Association convened with the Bessemer City Baptist Church, Tuesday, Oct. 3, 1922, Mrs. H. B. Moore, Superintendent, presiding.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Mrs. Andrews of Mt. Holly. Song, "All Hail the Power," was sung, after which the Lord's Prayer was repeated in concert. Passages of Scripture, bearing on "Jesus the Savior of the World" were read. Mrs. Andrews in her remarks following the reading of the Scripture, emphasized the grave importance of realizing our responsibility for the unsaved in our own homes and communities.

Song-"Jesus Saves."

Mrs. W. W. Williams, Bessemer City, most graciously welcomed the W. M. U. of Gaston County Association to Bessemer City and the Baptist church of Bessemer City. Miss Velma Culp of First Baptist Church, Belmont, in a very happy manner responded to the address of welcome.

175 delegates and visitors were enrolled. Reports of societies were called for. These reports were exceedingly gratifying and encouraging, all the Woman's Missionary Societies of the Association reporting; six Young Woman's Auxiliaries; 11 Sunbeams and one Royal Ambassador. Many points of encouragement were brought out in the reports, among these being reorganization of the W. M. Society at Ranlo and the organization of five new societies throughout the Association. Reports showed Cramerton as the only church in the Association having a complete organization, W. M. S., Y. W. A., G. A., and Sunbeam Society.

\$34.25 was collected for Associational Expense Fund.

Mrs. W. J. Francis, of Belmont, presented the report on the Special Christian Educational Work being done by the W. M. U.

of this Association. Report showed that \$99.85 had been contributed to the fund for Miss Cobb, a student at Meredith; \$201.13 to the fund for Miss Elmore at Mars Hill. Societies which had not met their pledges to these funds were urged to do so. Strong appreciation of these two young ladies was expressed. Upon motion of Mrs. W. J. Clifford of Gastonia, a collection was taken to help provide funds to enable Miss Elmore to resume her studies at Mars Hill. The collection amounted to \$40.45.

Treasurer's report was read and adopted. The Superintendent presented her report, showing progress and activity in the year's work. This was followed by a splendid inspirational address by the Superintendent on "Broadcasting," that was a strong appeal for enlarged service and deeper consecration and loyalty.

The Y. W. A. Conference, led by Mrs. W. C. Barrett of Gastonia, was next on the program. The conference was opened with the song, "He Lives on High," beautifully sung by the Y. W. A. of Bessemer City. Mrs. T. M. McCoy of Mt. Holly, presented the work of the Y. W. A. from the standpoint of a nonmember, in a splendidly prepared paper entitled "What a Y. W. A. Means to a Church."

Mrs. Bennett, of Cramerton, made a very strong appeal for personal service for the Y. W. A. showing its possibilities and the Biblical authority for it. Mrs. Barrett urged the young people present to consecrate their gifts to God and to use the young peoples organizations provided them to fit themselves for better service in His kingdom.

Morning session closed with prayer by Mrs. J. S. Wray, of Gastonia.

Adjournment for lunch at 12:15 p. m.

Afternoon Session

Resumed at 1:30 P. M., after a bountiful and sumptuous dinner, served by the ladies of the church in the spacious basement of the new church building, which is not yet completed.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Mrs. M. L. Barnes of South Gastonia. Song, "Amazing Grace," was sung. Mrs. Barnes read the Bible story of Sampson and called attention to the source of all strength and urged the ladies to take up the tasks before them in the assurance of this divine strength. Earnest prayer followed these remarks.

Minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Rev. F. D. Putman was recognized and as director of the Reinforcement Campaign of the 57-Million Campaign, addressed the Association on the plan and organization recently effected in the State and Association for the collection of the 75 Million pledges unmet and the securing of pledges from those who did not pledge and from those who have come into the churches since the campaign. He urged the co-operation of the women in this undertaking. The Association, by a rising vote, pledged its support to the State and Associational Directors in this compaign.

Mrs. H. B. Moore was appointed W. M. U. Director in Gaston County Association.

A most excellent and comprehensive paper on "What the 75-Million Campaign Has Done," was read by Mrs. McDowell, of Cherryville.

The Mission Study Conference was conducted by Mrs. J. S. Wray of Gastonia. The Conference took the form of a demonstration of a Missoin Study Class, showing first how a class should be conducted. This was very successfully done and it is hoped that this, together with the very earnest appeal for organization of classes, preceding the demonstration, will be productive of the forming of many Mission Study Classes during the year.

Mrs. M. O. Thornburg of Gastonia, conducted the conference on Personal Service. She gave some interesting statistics regarding personal work done in this Association. Miss Addie Leeper, of Belmont, made a strong appeal for Personal Service. Mrs. Waldrop, of McAdenville, in an excellent paper presented "Personal Work on the Foreign Field."

The Sunbeam Conference, conducted by Mrs. W. W. Williams, of Bessemer City, was one of the most delightful features of the afternoon session. Mrs. Williams gave a brief history of the organization and growth of the Sunbeam work. The Sunbeams of the Bessemer City church gave a most charming demonstration of a Mother Goose Missionary Society. It was splendidly given and with its portrayal of many of the weaknesses of members of Missionary Societies it brought to its listeners many helpful lessons.

Mrs. W. J. Francis, Assistant Superintendent of the Gaston County Association, presented her report for the year.

Thirty-five dollars in cash and pledges was secured as an additional amount to be added to the collection of the morning for educational fund for Miss Elmore.

A motion was made and carried that financial aid be rendered Miss Cobb by the Association, that she be enabled to remain at Meredith during the coming year. \$200.00 was secured in pledges from the societies represented for this fund.

Mrs. J. M. McCoy presented the following report on Resolutions:

- 3. We cannot refrain from voicing our appreciation of the work done in making the church beautiful for our reception. It was a joy to the eyes of us all.
- 4. We feel that words are inadquate to convey our enjoyment of the noonday luncheon. We were ushered down stairs, and behold! a feast was spread. There was enough and to spare for the hungry crowd. It was good to see, but taste proved it better still to eat.
 - 5. We cannot close without thanking our beloved Superin-

tendent for her annual message. It seemed to come straight from the Throne by way of her warm, loving heart. Whatever of good this Association has accomplished is largely due to her leadership.

PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

Woman's Missionary Union

Eighth Annual Session of the Woman's Missionary Union of the Gaston County Baptist Association held with the Cherryville Baptist Church, Cherryville, N. C., October 7, 1927, Mrs. W. J. Francis, superintendent, presiding.

The meeting opened at 10 o'clock with the singing of "Jesus Calls Us O'er the Tumult." Mrs. Edna Harris, corresponding secretary of the Woman's Missionary Union, led in a prayer for divine guidance for the meeting. Devotional exercises were conducted by Mrs. B. H. Carpenter, Scripture James 1:19-27. "Be ye doers of the Word and not hearers only," was the verse around which Mrs. Carpenter stressed the following thoughts:

- 1. Indifference between hearers and doers.
- 2. Discussion of the souls stirring messages from the W. M. U. programs.
- 3. Questions, What shall we do, Can God trust us, Have we lost our power to do good, How can we do it?
- 4. Methods, Purpose, Practical, Promotion, Prayer, Power.

After a prayer by Mrs. Geo. Grice that the women might all be doers of the Word, the welcome address was delivered by Mrs. E. E. McDowell and the response was by Mrs. O. W. Triplett.

Roll call of societies was then taken up, each report being read by the delegates appointed to do so and the report together with the money collected for Associational Expense was turned over to the Secretary.

Miss Ora Hull, president South Mountain Industrial Institute was recognized and spoke on the school and its needs. The appeal of the school always grips the audience as she tells of the struggles of the school and the sacrifices which are being made that young people may have a chance in the world.

Mrs. Edna R. Harris, Corresponding Secretary of the Woman's Work of North Carolina, addressed the meeting using as her subject the topic, "We Would See Jesus." In our church work, in our schools, in our aims for our children, in our W. M. U. work, our aim must be to magnify Him, else our vision of the work to be done is a blurred and vague one.

Mrs. W. C. Barrett very ably discussed the Ruby Anniversary Plan. The raising of the fund will be the means of sending back the missionaries who are at home to their work which they had to leave on account of lack of funds to carry on their work.

Mrs. B. Capps rendered a very delightful solo, "The Touch of His Hand on Mine."

The Superintendent appointed the following committees: Time and Place; Nominating Committee; Plans of Work; Obituaries; Resolutions.

The round table discussion was conducted by Mrs. C. P. Nanney, vice-president of the Association, Gastonia, N. C. The following topics were discussed and were directed by Mrs. Nanney; Reports, Personal Service, Apportionment, Standard of Excellence. Mrs. Ben Guion was especially instructive on the discussion of Standard of Excellence.

Dismission by prayer, Mrs. L. L. Jessup, leading.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The meeting was called to order by the Superintendent, Mrs. W. J. Francis. Song, "O Zion Haste," was sung after which Mrs. J. W. Kesterson used as her topic Matt. 5:17. Miss Alda Grayson who was present as missionary from China followed with a very fervent prayer. Mrs. B. Capps delivered a very timely and forceful message on Personal Service. Miss Grayson spoke in a very forceful manner on the topic, "Our Young People."

Mrs. E. V. Hudson, of Cramerton, spoke on the value of our missionary magazines and Biblical Recorder. It would seem that every woman in Gaston County would want to subscribe to our magazines and Biblical Recorder after listening to this splendid talk on the topic.

Mrs. L. L. Jessup presented Mission Study and its importance and the gain which would be ours in getting information from Mission Study.

At this time Mrs. Edna R. Harris, of Raleigh, N. C., Corresponding Secretary of Woman's Work, was called to the chair and presided during the reports of all committees and in her closing message left many suggestions which would benefit our society greatly if carried out. After singing the hymn, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," the closing prayer was offered by Mrs. Edna R. Harris.

Reports of Committees

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Out of 32 churches in Gaston County Baptist Association we have 23 missionary societies, eleven churches do not have any kind of organization. We have only five Y. W. A. societies, four G. A. societies, two Junior G. A. societies, one R. A. society, 14

Sunbeam Bands. There have been organized this year: 7 Sunbeam Bands, 1 Junior G. A., 2 G. A., 1 Y. W. A. Our apportionment was \$8,500 and reports show that we have collected \$7,936.26, showing a shortage of \$547.13 from last year. The following meetings were attended: Southern Baptist Convention, Louisville, Ky.; North Carolina State meeting, Wilmington; Charlotte Divisional meeting, Lenoir and eight district meetings in our own assocaition. The following is number of miles traveled, 2203; letters written, 581; meetings held 20; societies organized, 11; societies visited 18. Our association is divided into four divisions, two of these divisions had four meetings each, one had three meetings, one had one meeting. I wish to thank the divisional secretaries for their loyal support during the year and the untold good accomplished by them. I wish to thank all of the societies for their prompt reports and also want to thank every member of every society for their loyal support and cooperation for the past year. It has been a great pleasure to your superintendent to know you and to work with you.
