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



REV. WAYNE HENDREN

1923 - 1966

Rev. Robert Wayne Hendren was born in Wilkes County on November 18, 1923. He was saved at an early age and joined the Bethany Baptist Church. He pastored the Fairplains Baptist Church in Wilkes County and the Little River and Three Forks Baptist Churches in Alexander County. At the time of his summons home Rev. Hendren was serving on the General Board of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.

Bethel Baptist Church, where the 17th Annual Session of the Rocky Face Association met was the place where Rev. Hendren preached his first sermon.

Rev. Hendren was well known throughout the state for his evangelistic work.

He departed this life July 23, 1966 as the result of an accident

CONSTITUTION

Name

ARTICLE I

This Union of Churches shall be known as the Rocky Face Baptist Association.

Purpose

. 3000

ARTICLE II

The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men. It shall strive, as far as possible to aid in the development of the churches which constitute its membership. Each church shall be free to support such mission work as it feels led; however every church is urged to comply with the teaching of the scriptures concerning missions.

Membership

ARTICLE III

The membership of this Association shall be comprised of Missionary Baptist Churches and sponsored missions.

Churches or missions desiring affiliation with this Association, upon proper notice to the Association Executive Committee, shall be taken under the watchcare of the Association for one year; thence into membership.

All affiliated churches and missions shall be expected to cooperate in all associational programs of work.

Each church or mission may be represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association by at least three (3) messengers elected by the church from its active membership. Messengers shall be limited to a basis of 1-50 members after the basic three messengers (basic three messengers to equal the first 150 membership).

Affiliation

ARTICLE IV

This Association shall be affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and in turn with the Southern Baptist Convention.

Meetings

ARTICLE V

This Association shall hold an annual meeting the last Wednesday and Thursday in October of each year, the Thursday session to be a night session. Quarterly conferences shall be held the first Sunday afternoon of each quarter. The Executive Committee may call other meetings if deemed necessary.

Officers

ARTICLE VI

The officers of the Association shall be:

- (1) A Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk Treasurer, Historian, Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W.M.U. President.
- (2) The above officers are to be elected on the first day of the Annual Session and shall take charge at the close of the Session. Officers may be re-elected to successive terms if agreeable with both Association and officer.
- (3) All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee.
- (4) An Executive Committee shall be constituted of the following:
 - a. The pastor of each church or mission affiliated with the Association.
 - b. One Laymen elected by each church from its active membership.
 - c. Any other General Associational officer not herein under covered.
 - d. The committee shall elect a chairman from its own group.

Powers

ARTICLE VII

The powers of this body shall be kept in strict conformity with New Testament principles.

- (1) The Association cannot obligate or bind any church in any matter.
- (2) The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise lordship over God's heritage.
- (3) It shall act only as an advisory council in all matters. Then only when called upon by the churches.
- (4) Any church of the Association may appeal to the Association through the Executive Committee for advice.
- (5) The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until charges are brought against it by some other church and carefully considered by the Executive Committee of the Association.
- (6) The officers of the Association shall be expected to promote within the Association the duties of their office. It shall be their responsibility to contact, encourage and promote the work among the churches.
- (7) The Association shall have no power over the Ordination of Ministers or the organization of new churches, unless help is requested by interested parties.
- (8) All matters to be considered at the Annual Session shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to Annual Session.
- (9) All decisions shall be reached by majority vote of messengers present at the session.
- (10) Each messenger to exercise his voting priviledge must register with the clerk and wear his registration tag. An alternate voting in the place of a messenger must do likewise.

Committees

ARTICLE VIII

The Nominating Committee shall at the beginning of each Annual Session present to the body a slate of the following committees and or officers.

- (1) A slate of General Officers listed herein under.
- (2) Program Committee Annual Session 5 members (Vice Moderator, Clerk, one Pastor and two Laymen)

Program Committee-Quarterly Session-5 members

- (3) Time, Place, Preacher 3 members (any church wishing to invite the Association for the next Annual Session, shall do so by filing a written invitation with the clerk one month before the immediate session.
 - (4) A New Committee on Nominations 5 members.
 - (5) Resolutions 3 members.
- (6) The report of the Nominating Committee shall be printed in sufficient number for distribution at the Annual Session. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to contact each person that is placed before the body for election, to secure their assent.

BY _- _LAWS

ARTICLE I

All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer. ARTICLE II

The enrolled messengers present will constitute a quorum to transact business in the name of the Association.

Duties of Officers

ARTICLE III

(1) Moderator - preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint any committees as deemed necessary and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer.

The Book of Parliamentary Procedures by Keerfoot shall be the basis of ruling order.

He shall, so far as his private duties permit, communicate with the churches promoting the work of the Kingdom.

- (2) Vice Moderator preside in the absence or at the invitation of the Moderator. Perform all other duties common to moderator at his instructions.
- (3) Clerk Keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distribution of the same. One month following the Annual Association Meeting the clerk shall forward to the printer all material then in his possession for the printing of the minutes. The minutes are to be printed whether or not all church letters have been received at that time.

He shall be paid \$50.00 annually for his services.

(4) Treasurer - It shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and distribute all funds connected with the work of the Association as directed by the body, and to make an annual statement of the same.

All money paid into the Association treasury shall be acceptable by check only.

The treasurer shall be paid \$1.25 per hour for the number of hours actually spent discharging the work of the Association.

The treasurer shall act as the secretary for the Association.

- (5) Historian It shall be the duty of the Historian to prepare for publication in the minutes a historical sketch of the church with whom the day session is held.
- (6) Sunday School Superintendent, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director and W. M. U. President It shall be their duty to promote their respective work among the churches and at the associational level.

Duties of Committees

ARTICLE IV

- (1) Program: (Annual Session) It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare and publish at least 90 days prior to Annual Session the program agenda. A verbal commitment must be received from all participates on the program. In event a speaker cannot fill his commitment it shall be his responsibility to notify the committee, in advance of the session, except in extreme emergencies.
- (Quarterly Conference) To prepare an appropriate, informative and inspirational program. The committee shall use its own discretion as to program material.
- (2) Time, Place, and Preacher It shall be the duty of the committee to select the place of the next Annual Session, to fix the time, name the preacher and alternate to preach the Annual sermon. (see No. 3, Article VIII of Constitution).
- (3) Nominations It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to nominate the officers of the Association as well as standing committee members. This committee shall report to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to the Annual Session.
- (4) Resolutions It shall be the duty of the Committee on Resolutions to prepare and propose to the Association resolutions of appreciation to the host church, and consider any other matters referred to it by the moderator.

ARTICLE V

The expenses of the Association shall be provided for by the churches. Each church in the Association shall be expected to share in this provision of funds.

All money coming into the Association shall be directed to the treasurer.

For the sake of clarity the clerk shall advise each church at least 30 days prior to the Annual Session concerning the cost per copy of Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VI

Any motion for Associational or Executive Committee consideration must be presented in writing, at the time it is presented verbally, for consideration by the body or committee.

ARTICLE VII

It shall be the responsibility of the clerk to insert at the proper place in the printed minutes any new motion concerning Constitution, By-Laws or Policy that may be adopted.

ARTICLE VIII

The Constitution and By-Laws may be changed or amended or revised at any regular session if a majority of the messengers concur, provided the notice under Article VII of the Constitution has been given.

REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

1966

Under the impact of the life, ministry and teachings of Christ and under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, North Carolina Baptists, eighty-one years ago launched a Christian ministry of child care. This has grown considerably and is widely recognized for its qualities of service and pioneering spirit. Sons and daughters of the Children's Homes are scattered throughout the world. They are actively engaged in all walks of life and are making a significant contribution to the uplift of mankind as a result of their early Christian training made possible by North Carolina Baptists and other friends.

As we continue to build upon foundations already laid, special attention is being given certain areas of child care. An already strong program of group care is being strengthened at Mills Home, Kennedy Home and Odum Home. A good degree of progress has been realized in working with emotionally disturbed children at Greer Home in Chapel Hill. The demonstration Child Development Program for preschool children, conducted on the Mills Home campus, has had an excellent first year of operation. Churches throughout the state are studying the program and facilities preparatory to providing similar services. pects are encouraging for a home for children in the western part of the state more adequately to serve the needs of our people who live west of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Constant attention is being given to more effective ways of meeting the highly specialized needs of children coming out of broken and inadequate home situations.

We have a large number of good Christian homes for the care of foster children. More are needed in all sections of the state. Foster homes serve children of all ages and are of particular advantage for some who have special needs. Foster home parents may be of varying ages and circumstances in life. Coulpes with or without children of their own who have an abundance of love find this to be a challenging and rewarding opportunity of Christian service.

Sincere appreciation is expressed to all who have, in any way, helped to support our child care ministry. are indeed grateful for increasing income through Cooperative Program. Last year's Thanksgiving Offering is approaching three hundred fifteen thousand dollars (\$315, 000.00) and is the largest ever. Special gifts and designations such as the Once-a-month offering continue to provide a substantial part of our income. Through estate planning and the making of Christian wills an increasing number of individuals and families are investing in present and future generations of boys and girls who are in need of the services of the Baptist Children's Homes. Williams, former pastor of the Mills Home Baptist Church, is devoting full time to working with our Baptist people in this area, and he or other members of our staff will count it a privilege to assist you in exploring this field of Christian stewardship.

We covenant with you to face the future as we have the past: to offer Christian nurture to distressed children in the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

1966 Associational Report

Reflection on the past year of life in our four Baptist Homes for the Aging is a reminder once of the goodness of the Lord to us. We are constantly aware of the bountiful way in which He has blessed us, and this has been particularly true since our last report to the good people in our Baptist Associations.

During this time we have ministered to 172 deserving older men and women. All of these have been blessed by the love gifts of North Carolina Baptists, through the Special Day Offering, received on the third Sunday of February each year, and throught our share in the Cooperative Program. The large majority, at least 85%, have benefitted directly from these gifts and have actually been sustained at the point of their financial need.

The Special Day offering for 1966 is at an all time high and looks as if it might be \$100,000.00 for the first time. This is very good, and we are profoundly grateful. We must not forget, however, that, even though there has been a 5% increase in the offering from last year, costs have advanced 7%.

We are in the midst of miracles, and the past year has been one in which we have witnessed unusual blessings from the Lord. There have been fewer deaths than previously, and the critically ill, in many instances, have been brought back to a measure of reasonably good health. Nursing care has been of the highest quality, and you would rejoice to know how far your concern and your gifts go in ministering to the needs of the residents, particularly at the point of tender loving care in illness.

Perhaps the outstanding paradox in all of our homes is that the first resident to receive a Medicare card, during this first year of the operation of Medicare, is our oldest resident, who never takes any medication at all and who does not need to see a doctor, or to go to the hospital. She is Aunt Fannie Drumwright, who celebrated her 105th birthday in July.

It is anticipated that construction will begin on our fifth Home at Yanceyville during the coming year, and when it is completed, we will be able to minister in all of our Homes to 200 older men and women and relieve, in measure, the terrific pressure of a long waiting list of 170 people.

This ministry of love, in Christ's name, is dependent upon the concern, the love, the prayers, and the increased financial support of North Carolina Baptists. We are, therefore, going to count heavily on you and believe that you will not will not disappoint the aging people who are looking to you urgently for help.

Many of our lay friends, lawyers, bankers, trust officers, and other interested individuals have given of their time and have helped us materially in promoting our work.

Assets of the Foundation have increased during the past year and at the last accounting, around December, the total assets of the Foundation had reached approximately one million dollars including our real estate. Right many of our people are setting up memorial funds, trust agreements, annuity agreements, and are using other services provided by the Baptist Foundation. We believe we are organized in such a manner that we can answer most any request an individual makes of us, either through the church or as an individual, if he will make his wishes known to us. By this I mean that we can visit him individually and explain the work of the Foundation and how he may participate in it, or we can go to any group meeting that would provide an opportunity to discuss will making and uses of the Foundation. We covet your continued prayers for this work and hope that in the future you will make use of the facilities of The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc.

It has been a great priviledge to serve as your Sunday School Representative for the association during the past year.

HISTORY OF BETHEL BAPTIST CHURCH

Bethel Baptist Church is located in Alexander County ten miles northeast of Taylorsville. Bethel was organized around the year 1800. The records are lost from the organization up to the year of 1827. We find, however, that Bethel Church was represented in the Brier Creek Association in 1822.

The first place of worship was in a brush arbor about two miles west of the present site. A log building was erectted at the present site, around the year 1800.

We have no record when the second building was erected, but it was remodeled in the year 1871. A brick church building was built in 1947. In the early days of the church before 1822 A.M. Dodson was pastor, also E. M. Griffin. W. M. Beck acted as clerk and pastor from 1827 to 1836. Also S. P. Smith from 1838 to 1841.

There heve been thirty other pastors: W. M. Hines, 1841 to 1843; Z. B. Adams, 1843 to 1847; W. M. Garner, 1847 to 1848; J. Watts, 1848 to 1857; J. G. Bryan, 1857 to 1860; James Reid, 1860 to 1861; W. G. Brown, 1861 to 1868; J. Crouch, 1868 to 1870; W. A. Poole, 1870 to 1873; L. P. Gwaltney, 1873 to 1876; W. A. Poole, 1876 to 1877; L. P. Gwaltney, 1877 to 1881; J. P. Gwalyney, 1881 to 1884; W. A. Myers, 1884 to 1888; L. P. Gwaltney, 1888 to 1890; W. H. Vanhoy, 1890 to 1891; C. C. Poole, 1891 to 1894; D. W. Poole, 1894 to 1900; L. P. Gwaltney, 1900 to 1910; W. E. Linney, 1910 to 1912; J. W. Watts, 1912 to 1919; L. E. Barnes, 1919 to 1927; A. E. Watts, 1927 to 1931; S. I. Watts. 1931 to 1942; F. C. Watts, 1942 to 1943; J. A. Icenhour, 1943 to 1950; Clate Brown, 1950 to 1956; Irvin Wallace, 1956 to 1958; L. T. Younger, 1958 to 1962; Robert Ferguson, 1962 to 1966; Allie Walker 1966--present pastor.

Clerks that have served the church are W. M. Beck, 1827 to 1838; S. P. Smith, 1838 to 1841; W. M. Hines, 1841 to 1845; J. Hendren, 1845 to 1857; H. Hendren, 1857 to 1870; E. B. Hendren, 1870 to 1890; J. W. Hendren, 1890 to 1891; J. E. Gilreath, 1891 to 1898; A. C. Jones, 1898 to 1908; J. Y. Williams, 1908 to 1911; L. E. Barnes, 1911 to 1920; J. A. Campbell, 1920 to 1925; S. C. Campbell, 1925 to 1933; E. F. Millsaps, 1933 to 1955; V. K. Bentley, 1955 to 1963; E. F. Millsaps, 1963 to 1964; Frank Campbell, 1964 to the present time.

Preachers that have been ordained from Bethel are: L. P. Gwaltney, March 4, 1872; D. W. Poole, September 1, 1884; L. E. Barnes, September 15, 1917; Mack McCurdy, March 8, 1953; Asa Kerley, October 14, 1956.



ROCKY FACE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

CONSTITUTION

Name

ARTICLE I

This Union of Churches shall be known as the Rocky Face Baptist Association.

Purpose

ARTICLE II

The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men. It shall strive, as far as possible to aid in the development of the churches which constitute its membership. Each church shall be free to support such mission work as it feels led; however, every church is urged to comply with the teaching of the scriptures concerning missions.

Membership

ARTICLE III

The membership of this Association shall be comprised of Missionary Baptist Churches and sponsored missions.

Churches or missions desiring affiliation with this Association, upon proper notice to the Association Executive Committee, shall be taken under the watchcare of the Association for one year; thence into membership.

All affiliated churches and missions shall be expected to cooperate in all associational programs of work.

Each church or mission may be represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association by at least three (3) messengers elected by the church from its active membership. Messengers shall be limited to abasis of 1-50 members after the basic three messengers (basic three messengers to equal the first 150 membership).

Affiliation

ARTICLE IV

This Association shall be affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and in turn with the Southern Baptist Convention.

Meetings

ARTICLE V

This Association shall hold an annual meeting the last Wednesday and Thursday in October of each year, the Thursday session to be a night session. Quarterly conferences shall be held in the first Sunday afternoon of each quarter. The Executive Committee may call other meetings if deemed necessary.

Officers

ARTICLE VI

The officers of the Association shall be:

(I) A Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk Treasurer, Historian, Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W. M. U. President.

- (2) The above officers are to be elected on the first day of the Annual Session and shall take charge at the close of the Session. Officers may be re-elected to successive terms if agreeable with both Association and officer.
 - (3) All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee.
 - (4) An Executive Committee shall be constituted of the following:
 - a. The pastor of each church or mission affiliated with the Association.
 - b. One Laymen elected by each church from its active membership.
 - c. Any other General Associational officer not herein under covered.
 - d. The committee shall elect chairman from its own group.

Powers

ARTICLE VII

The powers of this body shall be kept in strict conformity with New Testament principles.

(I) The Association cannot obligate or bind any church in any matter.

(2) The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise loardship over God's heritage.

(3) It shall act only as an advisory council in all matters. Then only

when called upon by the churches.

(4) Any church of the Association may appeal to the Association

through the Executive Committee for advice.

(5) The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until charges are brought against it by some other church and carefully considered by the Executive Committee of the Association.

(6) The officers of the Association shall be expected to promote within the Association the duties of their office. It shall be their responsibility

to contact, encourage and promote the work among the churches.

(7) The Association shall have no power over the Ordination of Ministers or the organization of new churches, unless help is requested by interested parties.

(8) All matters to be considered at the Annual Session shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to Annual Session.

(9) All decisions shall be reached by majority vote of messengers present at the session.

(10) Each messenger to exercise his voting priviledge must register with the clerk and wear his registration tag. An alternate voting in the place of a messenger must do likewise.

Committees

ARTICLE VIII

The Nominating Committee shall at the beginning of each Annual Session present to the body a slate of the following committees and or officers.

(1) A slate of General Officers listed herein under.

(2) Program Committe-Annual Session-5 members (Vice Moderator, Clerk, one Pastor and two Laymen)

Program Committe-Quarterly Session-5 members

- (3) Time, Place, Preacher 3 members (any church wishing to invite the Association for the next Annual Session, shall do so by filing a written invitation with the clerk one month before the immediate session).
 - (4) A New Committee on Nominations 5 members.

(5) Resolutions - 3 members.

(6) The report of the Nominating Committee shall be printed in sufficient number for distribution at the Annual Session. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to contact each person that is placed before the body for election, to secure their assent.

BY - LAWS

ARTICLE I

All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer.

ARTICLE II

The enrolled messengers present will constitute a quorum to transact business in the name of the Association.

Duties of Officers

ARTICLE III

(1) Moderator - preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint any committees as deemed necessary and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer.

The Book of Parliamentary Procedures by Keerfoot shall be

the basis of ruling order.

He shall, so far as his private duties permit, communicate

with the churches promoting the work of the Kingdom.

- (2) Vice Moderator preside in the absence or at the invitation of the Moderator. Perform all other duties common to moderator at his instruction.
- (3) Clerk Keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distribution of the same. One month following the Annual Association Meeting the clerk shall forward to the printer all material then in his possession for the printing of the minutes. The minutes are to be printed whether or not all church letters have been received at that time.

He shall be paid \$50.00 annually for his services.

(4) Treasurer - It shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and distribute all funds connected with the work of the Association as directed by the body, and to make an annual statement of the same.

All money paid into the Association treasury shall be accept-

able by check only.

The treasurer shall be paid \$1.25 per hour for the number of hours actually spent discharging the work or the Association.

The treasurer shall act as the secretary for the Association.

(5) Historian - It shall be the duty of the Historian to prepare for publication in the minutes a historical sketch of the church with whom

the day session is held.

(6) Sunday School Superintendent, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director and W. M. U. President - It shall be their duty to promote their respective work among the churches and at the associational level.

Duties of Committees

ARTICLE IV

(I) Program: (Annual Session) It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare and publish at least 90 days prior to Annual Session the program agenda. A verbal commitment must be received from all participates on the program. In event a speaker cannot fill his commitment, it shall be his responsibility to notify the committee, in advance of the session, except in extreme emergencies.

(Quarterly Conference) - To prepare an appropriate, informative and inspirational program. The committee shall use its own discere-

tion as to program material.

(2) Time, Place, and Preacher - It shall be the duty of the committee to select the place of the next Annual Session, to fix the time, name of the preacher and alternate to preach the Annual sermon. (see No. 3, Article VIII of Constitution).

(3) Nominations - It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to nominate the officers of the Association as well as standing committee members. This committee shall report to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to the Annual Session.

(4) Resolutions - It shall be the duty of the Committee on Resolutions to prepare and propose to the Association resolutions of appreciation to the host church, and consider any other matters referred to it by the moderator.

ARTICLE V

The expenses of the Association shall be provided for by the churches. Each church in the Association shall be expected to share in this provision of funds.

All money coming into the Association shall be directed to the

treasurer.

For the sake of clarity the clerk shall advise each church at least 30 days prior to the Annual Session concerning the cost per copy of Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VI

Any motion for Associational or Executive Committee consideration must be presented in writing, at the time it is presented verbally, for consideration by the body or committee.

ARTICLE VII

It shall be the responsibility of the clerk to insert at the proper place in the printed minutes any new motion concerning Constitution, By Laws or Policy that may be adopted.

ARTICLE VIII

The Constitution and By-Laws may be changed or amended or revised at any regular session if a majority of the messengers concur, provided the notice under Article VII of the Constitution has been given.

REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC., 1967

Helping children and young people to grow and develop toward Christian maturity is one of the greatest privileges in life. No-task is more important than helping a child to grow into healthy, well-adjusted, responsible citizenship. At the Children's Homes we seek to provide the proper atmosphere, encouragement and supervision to assure the development of inborn, God given talents of our children.

This agency offers a variety of quality services to the children of families who have not been able to continue a satisfactory pattern of living together. A total of 33 cottages on five campuses provide group care of different kinds. There are two residences for emotionally disturbed children, convenient to a great medical center where psychiatric services are available. This fall, for the first time, a single cottage at Wallburg is being opened for the rehabilitation of boys.

In addition to group homes, the needs of many children are met throught the use of Foster Homes. A growing interest in this phase of our work is encouraging. Many families are finding happiness and opportunity for serving in caring for foster children. Thus, many boys and girls, who otherwise would not have this opportunity, are privileged to grow up in Christian homes. Should you have an "extra measure of love" to share in this way the Homes would like to know of your interest.

Regional case work centers, staffed by trained social workers, are located in six prominent areas of the state and add to the ability of the Homes to offer counseling services to distressed families and to those for whom family rehabilitation has been achieved.

In June of 1967, the first of the new family living cottages was completed and is being used by brothers and sisters who can profit by sharing the same home. This building was provided by Mr. and Mrs. William M. York of Greensboro, and is named the York Cottage. It is a model for the family living approach in group child care. A similar cottage is already under construction at Mills Home and two buildings of this type are now being built on the Kennedy Home campus.

The Child Development Center on the Mills Home Campus was established to serve the local community as a means of strengthening family life and to provide a demonstration and informational program which can offer assistance to churches in beginning any phase of weekday care and education for preschool children. During the 1967-68 session the Center will serve 70 children and their families in two kindergarten grou and nursery school groups, with about 35 children in full day care. The staff is providing consultation services upon request to churches interest in the program.

Members of the Board of Trustees and the Staff of the Children's Homes are committed to the task of maintaining a Christian Program of Child Care - a program that will merit the undivided support and loyalty of our people and that will bring favor to our Lord. To that end it is our purpose to meet as effectively as possible, the challenges of our day.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

1967 ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT

Your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging have been on the move during the past year. In fact, we will be ready to move into our new Home in Yanceyville in September and will be able to receive 30 more dear old people into the family of our Homes. When the Yanceyville Home, our fifth, is occupied, we will have a total of 200 deserving older men and women in our care in all of the Homes.

As you know, we now have four Homes and an Infirmary in operation. Resthaven and the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem; the Albermarle Home at Albermarle; the Hamilton Home at Hamilton.

In these Homes you have an eternal investment and can rejoice in the loving care which you are making possible for our older people. The majority are financially needy persons, and are supplemented through the love gifts of North Carolina Baptists. Two sources of income from the churches are increasingly vital in the support of our residents - the Special Day Offering, received on the 3rd Sunday of February each year, and our share in the Cooperative Program.

The Special Day Offering for 1967 is at an all-time high and has increased by 10% over last year. This is most commendable, but when we face the reality of costs, which have advanced by 20%, and the maintenance of a new Home and the care of 30 additional residents at Yancey ville, we could face a real crisis during the next year, unless the gifts from our Baptist people continue to increase in proportion to our needs.

We wish to thank all of our Baptist people across the State who are enabling us to minister to the aging in Christ's Name, and we want all of you to know that each of your 5 Homes exists for the people from all over our great State. We could not operate without your love, your prayers, your concern, and your financial support.

HISTORY OF SULPHUR SPRINGS BAPTIST CHURCH

Robert L. Steele, preached by monthly appointments for about one year on the porch of James L. Davis' house. The people atteding these services decided to build a brush arbor near the Davis Mill.

Here at this arbor, Robert L. Steele and Billy Pool held a Revival Meeting out of which grew the spirit of organizing a church the third (3) Saturday in October 1867. The name of the church was easy to get. Sulphur Springs Baptist Church. There were twenty-two (22) charter members.

The first church was built on the site where the Davis Hotel stood it was used until 1885 when the members decided to build a new church the new church was built on a site about 300 yards southwest of the old church in beautiful Oak Grove. This same site and church building was used with some remodeling on the building until 1953, when the old building was turned to face the highway and a dozen or more new Sunday School rooms built at the back of the new building.

In 1961, the members voted to build a Parsonage also in 1961, the members voted to have a full time Pastor.

In 1966, under the leadership of Don McIntyre, a major renobation has been completed. The sanctuary has been lengthened, a baptistry added, a new educational building has been built with assembly room, nursery, Sunday School rooms and additional space for storage.

(Jonah, the Unwilling Missionary)

Jonah 1:2





CONSTITUTION

Name

ARTICLE I

This Union of Churches shall be known as the Rocky Face Baptist

Purpose

ARTICLE II

The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men. It shall strive, as far as possible to aid in the development of the churches which constitute its membership. Each church shall be free to support such mission work as it feels led; however, every church is urged to comply with the teaching of the scriptures concerning missions.

Membership

ARTICLE III

The membership of this Association shall be comprised of Missionary Baptist Churches and sponsored missions.

Churches or missions desiring affiliation with this Association, upon proper notice to the Association Executive Committee, shall be taken under the watchcare of the Association for one year; thence into membership.

All affiliated churches and missions shall be expected to cooperate in all associational programs of work.

Each church or mission may be represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association by at least three (3) messengers elected by the church from its active membership. Messengers shall be limited to a basis of 1-50 members after the basic three messengers (basic three messengers to equal the first 150 membership).

Affiliation

ARTICLE IV

This Association shall be affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and in turn with the Southern Baptist Convention.

Meetings

ARTICLE V

This Association shall hold an annual meeting the last Wednesday and Thursday in October of each year, the Thursday session to be a night session. Quarterly conferences shall be held in the first Sunday afternoon of each quarter. The Executive Committee may call other meetings if deemed necessary.

Officers

ARTICLE VI

The officers of the Association shall be:

- (1) A Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk Treasurer, Historian, Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W. M. U. President.
- (2) The above officers are to be elected on the first day of the Annual Session and shall take charge at the close of the Session. Officers may be re-elected to successive terms if agreeable with both Association and officer.
- (3) All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating
- (4) An Executive Committee shall be constituted of the following:
 - a. The pastor of each church or mission affiliated with the Association.
 - b. One Laymen elected by each church from its active membership.
 - c. Any other General Associational officer not herein under covered.
 - d. The committee shall elect chairman from its own group.

Powers

ARTICLE VII

The powers of this body shall be kept in strict conformity with New Testament principles.

- (1) The Association cannot obligate or bind any church in any matter.
- (2) The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise loardship over God's heritage.
- (3) It shall act only as an advisory council in all matters. Then only when called upon by the churches.
- (4) Any church of the Association may appeal to the Association through the Executive Committee for advice.

ROCKY PACE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

- (5) The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until charges are brought against it by some other church and carefully considered by the Executive Committee of the Association.
- (6) The officers of the Association shall be expected to promote within the Association the duties of their office. It shall be their responsibility to contact, encourage and promote the work among the churches.

(7) The Association shall have no power over the Ordination of Ministers or the organization of new churches, unless help is

requested by interested parties.

- (8) All matters to be considered at the Annual Cession shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to Annual Session
- (9) All decisions shall be reached by majority vote of messengers present at the session.
- (10) Each messenger to exercise his voting priviledge must register with the clerk and wear his registration tag. An alternate voting in the place of a messenger must do likewise.

Committees

ARTICLE VIII

The Nominating Committee shall at the beginning of each Annual Session present to the body a slate of the following committees and or officers.

(1) A slate of General Officers listed herein under.

(2) Program Committee-Annual Session-5 members (Vice Moderator, Clerk, one Pastor and two Laymen)

Program Committee-Quarterly Session-5 members

- (3) Time, Place, Preacher 3 members (any church wishing to invite the Association for the next Annual Session, shall do so by filing a written invitation with the clerk one month before the immediate session).
 - (4) A new Committee on Nominations 5 members.

(5) Resolutions - 3 members.

(6) The report of the Nominating Committee shall be printed in sufficient number for distribution at the Annual Session. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to contact each person that is placed before the body for elections, to secure thier assent.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer.

ARTICLE II

The enrolled messengers present will constitute a quorum to transact business in the name of the Association.

Duties of Officers

ARTICLE III

(1) Moderator - preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint any committees as deemed necessary and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer.

The Book of Parliamentary Procedures by Keerfoot shall be the basis of ruling order.

He shall, so far as his private duties permit, communicate with the churches promoting the work of the Kingdom.

- (2) Vice Moderator preside in the absence or at the invitation of the Moderator. Perform all other duties common to moderator at his instruction.
- (3) Clerk keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distribution of the same. One month following the Annual Association Meeting the clerk shall forward to the printer all material then in his possession for the printing of the minutes. The minutes are to be printed whether or not all church letters have been received at that time.

He shall be paid \$50.00 annually for his services.

(4) Treasurer - it shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and distribute all funds connected with the work of the Association as directed by the body, and to make an annual statement of the same.

All money paid into the Association treasury shall be acceptable by check only.

The treasurer shall be paid \$1.25 per hour for the number of hours actually spent discharging the work or the Association.

The treasurer shall act as the secretary for the Association.

- (5) Historian it shall be the duty of the Historian to prepare for publication in the minutes a historical sketch of the church with whom the day session is held.
- (6) Sunday School Superintendent, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director and W. M. U. President it shall be their duty to promote their respective work among the churches and at the associational level.

Duties of Committees

ARTICLE IV

(1) Program: (Annual Session) It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare and publish at least 90 days prior to

Annual Session the program agenda. A verbal commitment must be received from all participates on the program. In event a speaker cannot fill his commitment, it shall be his responsibility to notify the committee, in advance of the session, except in extreme emergencies.

(Quarterly Conference) - To prepare an appropriate, informative and inspirational program. The committee shall use its own disceretion as to program material.

- (2) Time, Place, and Preacher it shall be the duty of the committee to select the place of the next Annual Session, to fix the time, name of the preacher and alternate to preach the Annual sermon. (see No. 3, Article VIII of Constitution).
 (3) Nominations it shall be the duty of the Committee on
- (3) Nominations it shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to nominate the officers of the Association as well as standing committee members. This committee shall report to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to the Annual Session.
- (4) Resolutions it shall be the duty of the Committee on Resolutions to prepare and propose to the Association resolutions of appreciation to the host church, and consider any other matters referred to it by the moderator.

ARTICLE V

The expenses of the Association shall be provided for by the churches. Each church in the Association shall be expected to share in this provision of funds.

All money coming into the Association shall be directed to the treasurer.

For the sake of clarity the clerk shall advise each church at least 30 days prior to the Annual Session concerning the cost per copy of Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VI

Any motion for Associational or Executive Committee consideration must be presented in writing, at the time it is presented verbally, for consideration by the body or committee.

ARTICLE VII

It shall be the responsibility of the clerk to insert at the proper place in the printed minutes any new motion concerning Constitution, By-Laws or Policy that may be adopted.

ARTICLE VIII

The Constitution and By-Laws may be changed or ammended or revised at any regular session if a majority of the messengers concur, provided the notice under Article VII of the Constitution has been given.

REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATION

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

1968

North Carolina Baptists and other-friends of the Children's Homes are making possible a Christian way of life for hundreds of boys and girls who otherwise would be denied many of life's best opportunities. More than 1300 children were assisted in some type of service during the past year.

All associated with the Children's Homes are deeply grateful for every type of support. Co-operative Program income through the churches is increasingly important. Last year's Thanksgiving offering is the largest ever - now approaching \$325,000. Special gifts, bequests through wills and estate planning provide much needed income and wonderful opportunities to invest in the lives of children and young people.

Encouraging progress is being made in the capital funds campaign to build a home for children in Western North Carolina to be located in Haywood County between Waynesville and Clyde. It is hoped that construction can begin in early 1969. The Western Home, in addition to providing group care, will strengthen all types of services now being provided children and their families in the Western area.

Four family style cottages have been constructed and dedicated during the past year - two at Mills Home and two at Kennedy Home. Two additional cottages will be constructed at Mills Home during the coming year. Funds for these buildings have come from bequests through estate planning by friends of neglected and dependent children.

The number of good Christian homes for the care of foster children is growing. More are needed in all sections of the state. Foster homes serve children of all ages and are particularly helpful for some who have special needs. Couples with or without children of their own, who have an abundance of love, find this to be a challenging and rewarding opportunity for Christian service.

Members of the Board of Trustees and members of the staff of the Homes are dedicated to a program of child care that will merit the undivided loyalty and support of our people and that will be worthy the blessings of our Lord. We convenant with you to face the future as we have the past: to offer Christian nurture to children in distress in the name of Christ our Savior and Lord.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES

The Past year in your Baptist Homes for the Aging has been one of the most eventful in the history of the Homes. Of primary significance was the opening of the Yanceville Home on November 1, 1967, and dedicatory services on April 25, 1968, with Governor Dan K. Moore as the principal speaker.

When the Yanceville Homes, accommodating 31 residents, is filled to capacity, the number living in all our Homes will reach 200. Residents at Yanceyville, Resthaven, the Albermarle Home, the Hayes Homes, the Hamilton Home, and the Infirmary Constitute a large and ever-growing family of elderly people who receive compassionate and tender care.

The waiting list for admission to one of our five Homes continues to grow, but has been revised and is a bit more realistic than ever before. The opening of the Yanceville Home has relieved the pressure greatly on this waiting list, and persons are encouraged to make application from the various sections of our great State.

Baptist of North Carolina can be grateful for their record in Ministering to the residents in their five Homes for the Aging. Recent reports reveal that our Baptist Homes for the Aging are given more financial assistance to their needy Aging than other denominational home in North Carolina. About 85% of the residents ministered unto receive assistance through the love gifts of North Carolina Baptist. These love gifts from our Baptist Churches come from two main sources; (1) The Special Day offering, received on the third Sunday of February each year, from which the Homes derive 22 1/2% of their total support; (2) The Cooperative Program from which we receive 12 1/2% of total income. Gifts for 1967 through these two sources were at an all time high and amounted to around \$200,000.00. The 1968 Special Day Offering at this time, is reflecting an encouraging increase. Unless these two vital sources of income are increased considerably, your Baptist Homes cannot be maintained, either on the basis of quality of care, or quantity.

More than in any previous year the ministery of the Homes has been extended beyond the day to day care of the residents to our local Churches and communities. Experiences have been shared in more than one Association, in world Missions Conferences, Family Life Conferences, High School Classes in Family Living, etc.

Life among the residents in the Homes is most interesting, and if one wonders about activity among those whose average age is 80, let him come and see. Let everyone who is contributing in this great area of human need be grateful to the Lord to be a part of a great denomination that has had the vision to plan for the aging, and is moving forward in meeting the needs of this very deserving group.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

This is a full year at our Baptist Hospital with more than thirty thousand sick people being given medical service and Christian ministry, and more than 165,000 visits being made to the clinics of the hospital. In addition to this, more than 700 persons are receiving training in the various fields of medical care and Christian service, and a vast amount of medical research is being done in the causes and treatments of the diseases which afflict us and our loved ones.

The Development Program, which is greatly to increase the capacity of the Medical Center to train and to serve, is progressing on schedule. The new power plant is scheduled to go into

operation in October. The paramedical school building is due to be ready by next April. It will provide the best in teaching facilities and make it possible to double the capacity of our nine schools and to add new Schools. The Medical School addition, is to be ready by September. 1969, and will allow that school to enlarge by 35%. Contracts are due to be let in October for the new patient building, which is to be completed in 1971. This building and the remodeling of the oldest part of the present plant will provide more than 200 new patient beds and greatly enlarge space and facilities for offices and for examinations and treatment of patients.

The cost of this large Development Program is being provided by interested individuals, corporations, foundations and government agencies, which recognize the valuable service our Medical Center is rendering and the urgent need for greatly enlarging these services.

But this is a very difficult year financially, and our hospital has been forced to make important changes in its financial policies. In the face of the mounting costs and the increasing needs of our people, the hospital has been struggling with a growing deficit. We have been told this for several years but the gap has continued to increase between the cost of free service and the money we have provided for this service. The amount of the free service now will have to be governed by the amount of the Mother's Day Fund. A patient's hospital bill will be estimated in advance, any available hospital insurance will be deducted, and the balance must be paid before the patient is admitted unless he is certified by his county welfare department or some other agency. Any balance beyond the estimated bill must be paid before the patient is discharged. In case of an emergency, the patient may be admitted but the hospital bill must be paid as soon as possible after admission. The Mother's Day Fund will be used, as it has been, to pay the difference between the amount paid by the certifying agency and the total cost of caring for the patient.

The great concern at our Baptist Hospital is for these patients who must have financial assistance if they are to get the specialized care they need. But the hospital has come to the point that it cannot continue to operate without the money necessary to cover the cost. In view of the circumstances, we believe the great majority of our pastors and our people will understand these changes and give their full cooperation. The Mother's Day Offering will need to be increased greatly if our hospital is to fulfill its mission to our people who most need it. We want to assure our hospital that it can depend upon us in full measure.

HISTORY OF THREE FORKS BAPTIST CHURCH

In the year 1800 there was a family by the name of Brumbley who lived at the old Billy Brown home place, as it was known in later years. The mother died and was buried in what is now Little River township, Alexander County. The surrounding community began to use this site as a burying gound, until the year 1857 when a church was constituted. Tradition has it that there was a shelter for funeral services.

Three Forks Baptist Church was organized on May 14, 1857, with 37 charter members. The charter, members being in regular standing and in full fellowship came from Little River Baptist Church

A frame building was built in 1859 and was used for church purposes until a new church was built across the road in 1896.

A present building was erected 1945. An educational building was added to this in 1959. There was also a baptistry added at this time.

Land was purchased beside the church in 1961 and a parsonage built in 1962.

A new educational building and library was built to the left side of the church in 1965.

The sanctuary has been remodled and lengthened, a steeple added and an educational building built to the right side of the church in 1968.

Sunday School was organized in 1870.

Training Union was organized in 1958. And we had our first WMU meeting 1963.

Three Forks Church has had twenty pastors, part of these serving several different times. Rev. W. J. Bumgarner was pastor twenty one years. Rev. E. V. Bumgarner served for twenty four years. Our present pastor is Rev. Dean Dillard.





CONSTITUTION

Name

TICLE I

This Union of Churches shall be known as the Rocky Face Baptist sociation.

Purpose

TICLE II

The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's ngdom among men. It shall strive, as far as possible to aid in the velopment of the churches which constitute its membership. Each urch shall be free to support such mission work as it feels led; wever, every church is urged to comply with the teaching of the riptures concerning missions.

Membership

TICLE III

The membership of this Association shall be comprised of ssionary Baptist Churches and sponsored missions.

Churches or missions desiring affiliation with this Association, on proper notice to the Association Executive Committee, shall be ken under the watchcare of the Association for one year; thence to membership.

All affiliated churches and missions shall be expected to coerate in all associational prgrams of work.

Each church or mission may be represented at the Annual Meeting the Association by at least three (3) messengers elected by the urch from its active membership. Messengers shall be limited to a sis of 1-50 members after the basic three messengers (basic three ssengers to equal the first 150 membership).

Affiliation

TICLE IV

This Association shall be affiliated with the North Carolina

Baptist State Convention and in turn with the Southern Baptist Convention.

Meeting

ARTICLE V

This Association shall hold an annual meeting the last Wednesday and Thursday in October of each year, the Thursday session to be a night session. Quarterly conferences shall be held in the first Sunday afternoon of each quarter. The Executive Committee may call other meetings if deemed necessary.

Officers

ARTICLE VI

The officers of the Association shall be:

(1) A Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk Treasurer, Historian, Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Directory, and W. M. U. President.

- (2) The above officers are to be elected on the first day of the Annual Session and shall take charge at the close of the Session. Officers may be re-elected to successive terms if agreeably with both Association and officer.
- (3) All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee.
- (4) An Executive Committee shall be constituted of the following:
 - a. The pastor of each church or mission affiliated with the Association.
 - b. One Laymen elected by each church from its active membership.
 - Any other General Associational officer not herein under covered.
 - d.- The committee shall elect chairman from its own group.

Powers

ARTICLE VII

The powers of this body shall be kept in strick conformity with New Testament principles.

(1) The Association cannot obligate or bind any church in any matter.

(2) The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise loardship over God's heritage.

(3) It shall act only as an advisory council in all matters.

Then only when called upon by the churches.

(4) Any church of the Association may appeal to the Association

through the Executive Committee for advice.

- (5) The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until charges are brought against it by some other church and carefully considered by the Executive Committee of the Association.
- (6) The officers of the Association shall be expected to promote within the Association the duties of their office. It shall be their responsibility to contact, encourage and promote the work among the churches.

(7) The Association shall have no power over the Ordination of Ministers or the organization of new churches, unless help is re-

quested by interested parties.

- (8) All matters to be considered at the Annual Session shall be presented to the Exceutive Committee at least 90 days prior to Annual Session.
- (9) All decisions shall be reached by majority vote of messengers present at the session.
- (10) Each messenger to exercise his voting priviledge must register with the clerk and wear his registration tag. An alternate voting in the place of a messenger must do likewise.

Committees

ARTICLE VIII

The Nominating Committee shall at the beginning of each Annual Session present to the body a slate of the following committees and or officers.

- (1) A slate of General Officers listed herein under.
- (2) Program Committee-Annual Session-5 members (Vice Moderator, Clerk, one Pastor and two Laymen.
- (3) Time, Place, Preacher 3 members (any church wishing to invite the Association for the next Annual Session, shall do so by filing a written invitation with the clerk one month before the immediate session).
 - (4) A new Committee on Nominations 5 members.
 - (5) Resolutions 3 members
- (6) The report of the Nomination Committee shall be printed in sufficient number for distribution at the Annual Session. It shall be

the duty of the Committee on Nominations to contact each person that is placed before the body for elections, to secure their assent.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

All mettings shall be opened and closed with prayer.

ARTICLE II

The enrolled messengers present will constitute a quorum to transact business in the name of the Association.

Duties of Officers

ARTICLE III

(1) Moderator - preside at the meeting, preserve order, appoint any committees as deemed necessary and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer.

The Book of Parliamentary Procedures by Keerfoot shall be the basis of ruling order.

be the basis of ruling order.

He shall, so far as his private duties permit, communicate

- with the churches promoting the work of the Kingdom.

 (2) Vice Moderator preside in the absence or at the invitation of the Moderator. Perform all other duties common to moderator at histruction.
- (3) Clerk keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distribution of the same. One month following the Annual Association Meeting the clerk shall forward to the printer all material then in his possession for the printing of the minutes. The nimutes are to be printed whether or not all church letters have been received at that time.

He shall be paid \$50.00 annually for his services.

(4) Treasurer - it shall be the duty of the treasurer to recei and distribute all funds connected with the work of the Association directed by the body, and to make an annual statement of the same.

All money paid into the Association treasury shall be acce

able by check only.

The treasurer shall be paid \$1.25 per hour for the number hours actually spent discharging the work or the Association.

The treasurer shall act as the secretary for the Associati

ICLE IV

(1) Program: (Annual Session) It shall be the duty of the gram Committee to prepare and publish at least 60 days prior to ual Session the program agenda. A verbal commitment must be eived from all participates on the program. In event a speaker not fill his commitment, it shall be his responsibility to notify committee, in advance of the session, except in extreme emergen-

(Quarterly Confernece) - To prepare an appropriate, informaand inspirational program. The committee shall use its own creretion as to program material.

- (2) Time, Place, and Preacher it shall be the duty of the nittee to select the place of the next Annual Session, to fix the , name of the preacher and alternate to preach the Annual sermon. No. 3, Article VIII of Constitution).
- (3) Nominations it shall be the duty of the Committee on inations to nominate the officers of the Association as well as ading committee members. This committee shall report to the autive Committee at least 60 days prior to the Annual Session.
- (4) Resolutions it shall be the duty of the Committee on plutions to prepare and propose to the Association resolutions of reciation to the host church, and consider any other matters referto it by the moderator.

ICLE V

The expenses of the Association shall be provided for by the ches. Each church in the Association shall be expected to share this provision of funds.

All money coming into the Association shall be directed to the surer.

For the sake of clarity the clerk shall advise each church at 30 days prior to the Annual Session concerning the cost per of Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VI

Any motion for Associational or Executive Committee consideration must be presented in writing, at the time it is presented verbally, for consideration by the body or committee.

ARTICLE VII

It shall be the responsibility of the clerk to insert at the proper place in the printed minutes any new motion concerning Constitution, By-Laws or Policy that may be adopted.

ARTICLE VIII

The Constitution and By-Laws may be changed or ammended or revised at any regular session if a majority of the messengers concur, provided the notice under Article VII of the Constitution has been given.

REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

1969

Among church supported agencies, North Carolina Baptists are fortunate to have one of the finest programs in the nation for the care and development of dependent children and for strengthening and supporting famil life. This is an application of the teaching and example of Christ in His earthly ministry. More than 1,200 children and their families are served annually.

The Children's Homes, thourgh a variety of quality services, is

recognized as a family service agency This is made possible by well trained and professional staff who provide leadership for group care programs, foster home care, family services, consultation with churches in pre-school programs and planning for higher education of children who have been in care. This program unfolds on six campuses and through the work of regional casework centers throughout the State.

More requests for services are now coming to the Baptist Children's Homes than at any time in our previous history. All agency beds are filled and all available money is being utilized. We, too, have been caught in the rising costs of living and in an inflationary economy. A wider variety of quality services are being demanded to meet the needs of children who are the products of today's complex society. Present economic conditions make it necessary to have additional operating income with which to maintain the current program before any further expansion of services can be considered.

Friends of the Children's Homes, in Western North Carolina, have responded generously to the Founders and Builders Program to raise funds with which to establish the Broyhill Home to serve children in Western North Carolina. Sufficient funds have been given and pledged to purchase the land, to prepare the site and to construct the first two cottages for children. When the campus has been completed provision will have been made for four cottages for children, a multi-purpose administration and activities building and a home for the superintendent. With the support and cooperation of Baptists and other friends of the Homes another ministry is being developed in Asheville. A home in which to serve unwed mothers and their offspring will be opened during the fall of 1969.

By the use of designated gifts and bequests from individuals and families, significant progress is being made in the long range plans for upgrading of facilities. Two cottages are now under construction at Mills Home. A recreation building and an infirmary at Kennedy Home and two cottages for children at the Broyhill Home are scheduled for construction during the next year.

The contribution of our Baptist people through the Cooperative Program, the Thanksgiving Offering and special gifts are essential to our continued operation and are received with deep appreciation. An increasing number of friends are finding a rewarding stewardship opportunity through the establishment of trusts for the HOmes and by means of wills and estate planning for the needs of dependent children. Members of the staff are available for consultation in estate planning and the preparation of wills.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES

Never before have your Baptist Homes for the Aging been more conscious of the Lord's Presence and of His Goodness than during the past year. At a time when the economy of the Homes was at its lowest ebb, with a sizeable deficit looming larger by the moment, when the weather was at its severest on the 3rd Sunday of February, the day of the Special Offering, the churches came through with an offering that promises, at this point, to be the greatest in the Home's history. The Lord, who is in charge of the weather and in charge of the Baptist Homes for the Aging, has surely rewarded our faith and moved upon our Baptist people to see the urgency of our needs, and we are grateful.

Ours shall continue to be a relationship of trust in the Lord and faith in our Baptist people. We earnestly hope that a continued and sustained effort will be made by our churches to increase and strengthen the amount of the two main means of support for our ministry to the Aging—the Special Offering, and the Cooperative Program. Through these two sources, one—third of the total income for the HOmes is derived, and 85% of the residents, who are financially dependent, are cared for and supplemented. If we are to continue to assist these many needy persons, and if we are to reduce the deficit in the operation of the Homes, brought about by the rising cost of living, we must have more liberal support from our churches.

BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONAL FOUNDATION REPORT FOR 1969

By: C. Gordon Maddrey, Executive Secretary

The assets of The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., have now reached beyond the one million dollar (\$1,000,000) mark, including trust funds and real estate. Since the reactivation of the Foundation, around 1962, the total assets have increased from \$350,000 to the present excess of slightly over one million. This is positive proof that the Baptists of North Carolina have discovered that the Foundation is really a service arm of the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

As mentioned above, the Foundation renders a service to: (1) God, (2) individual Baptists, and (3) Baptist agencies and institutions. Every Baptist has an opportunity through his Foundation to provide for continuing stewardship in the agencies and institutions in which he has an interest.

The foundation has again this year put particular interest upon the

making of wills. Several of our churches have used the facilities of the Foundation to conduct Will Clinics and reports from these clinics indicate that they were most successful. We have also had an opportunity to counsel with many people concerning their own wills, and in some instances we have provided the information and direction necessary for inclusion of Baptist causes in their will.

We have had a most successful year and can attest to the fact that the Foundation is on the move and is rendering service to individual Baptists in a most concrete way.

WHITE PLAINS BAPTIST CHURCH

Before White Plains Church was established the nearest Baptist churches were: Taylorsville First, Sulphur Springs, Macedonia, and Mt. Nebo. Because of the distance many in the community were not attending services anywhere.

Mrs. Emma Adams became concerned about her boys and others in the community and was afraid that they were going to be lost. Mrs. Adams met Mr. C. F. Friday in the road one Sunday Morning as he was on his way to Mt. Nebo Church and discussed the matter which was on her heart. They decided to try to organize a Sunday School and Mr. Friday agreed to conduct the service.

Mrs. Emma Adams, her boys and Mrs. Arthur Adams along with Mrs. Fate Compbell and her son, John, and Mrs. W. C. Kerley began raking, cutting sprouts, and cleaning the grounds to make ready for the service. Seating space was provided by logs and rough plank seats placed between the trees in the grove. The grove was the property of T. F. Adams (father-in law of Mrs. Emma Adams whose husband was Fielding Adams) and was later deeded to the church. (Deed dated August, 1912) Sunday School was first held in June, 1912.

The first revival was held in the grove on the third Sunday in September, 1912. It was conducted by Elders D. W. Poole, Vasti, N. C.; J. W. watts, Liledown, N. C.; and L. P. Gwaltney, Hiddenite, N. C. In this revival there were 39 conversions, 20 being baptized.

White Plains Baptist Church was organized on Saturday, November 9, 1912 in the grove. A presbytery composed of Elders L. P. Gwaltney, D. W. Pool, and J. W. Watts, and Deacons J. E. Chatham, J. W. Pharr, and B. F. Patterson met and organized by electing Elder J. W. Watts Chairman who in turn called J. L. Teague to act as clerk. Thirty-four people came forward, bearing letters, as follows: W. C. Kerley (ordained deaco

Stella Mayberry, C. C. Mayberry, Maudie Mayberry, A. C. Mayberry, Katie Mayberry, Pinkey Mayberry, Ralph Mayberry, Romulus Mayberry, M. E. Mayberry, Minnie Mayberry, C. F. Friday, Kelaey H. Campbell, J. L. Compbell, James C. Compbell, Fielding Adams, H. A. Pressley, M. J. Icenhour, A. V. Brown, A. M. Brown, Mary Kerley, I. M. Atwood, M. E. Little, J. E. Kerley, Hessie Friday, M. J. Childers, Florence Campbell Lackey, Emma Adams, Ella Little, Jane Mullis, Jay Robinette, H. C. Childers, and J. B. Blankenship. The following twenty who were baptized after the first revival also came forward: Mavis Blankenship, Levitis Blankenship, Jettie Little, Trivie Childers, Florence Pressley, Nina Smith, Dottie Smith, Emma Burgess, Ola Sloope, Della Sloope, George Smith, Maurice Childers, John B. Sloope, James Hines, Ernest Hines, Arthur Adams, Ina Adams, Robert Adams, Walter Adams, Mamie Adams, R. P. Pressley, and Partee Childers. Brother L. P. Gwaltney was appointed to examine the applicants. After a satisfactory examination on the fundamental doctrines of the Bible, Brother L. P. Gwaltney then read a chuch covenant, to which all the members gave their vote of adoption by rising.

The covenant is as follows to wit:

Having been as we trust brought by devine grace to embrace the Lord Jesus Christ, We do not solemnly covenant with each other to walk together in Him with brotherly love to His Glory, as our Common Lord. We do therefore in His strength engage:

- I. That we will exercise a Christian Care and watch over each other for good.
- II. That we will warn, admonish, and dexort each other to love and good works.
- III. That we will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together, but will uphold the worship and ordinances of God's house.
- IV. We will maintain personal and family religion in our homes, striving to lead our children and those under our care to the service of Christ and the enjoyment of Heaven.
- V. That we will seek devine aid, endeavoring to walk circumspectly before the world that we may lead others to Christ.
- VI. That we will cheerfully contribute of our means, as God may prosper us, for the poor, and to maintain the gospel at home and abroad.
- VII. And may thee God of All Grace make us perfect to do His will working in us that which is well pleasing in His sight through Jesus

Christ; to Whom be Glory forever and ever. Amen.

The following deacons were ordained: Fielding Adams, C. C. Mayberry, Jay Robinette, H. A. Pressley and J. D. Blankenship.

After organization of the church, services were held in Glade Creek School House by Rev. J. W. Watts from December 8, 1912 to April 12, 1913, when the first service was held in the First new church building.

The church progressed rapidly and in August, 1914 a revival was held by Rev. L. P. Gwaltney, G. Y. Bumgarner, D. W. Poole, and Elbert Payne, and J. W. Watts, pastor. The fifth Sunday in August, 1914, a baptizing was recored with over 2,000 people present.

Rev. J. W. Watts served as pastor until January, 1918, and at that time Brother George Bumgarner was called and served until his death. Rev E. V. Bumgarner filled the pulpit from March 8, 1919 until June 7, 1919. The chuch then called Rev. Elbert Payne, who served as pastor til September 20, 1924. Rev. A. W. Wilcox served from 1924 to September 8, 1928. Rev. J. W. Watts served again from 1928 until October 8, 1932. Rev. S. I. Watts werved from that time until June 1944 and from July 1944 until October of that year, Rev. J. C. Gwaltney pastored. At that time Rev. Wade Rogers was called and he served until November 1946. Rev. R. C. Loyd served from December 1946 until December 1952. Rev. Mack McCurdy was then called as pastor from February, 1953 until June 1958, at which time Rev. Arthur Jenkins became pastor, until April 24, 1966. Rev. Charlie Poole became pastor, July 1966 until June 1967. Rev. James Hartness became pastor October 29, 1967 and is still serving.

Ministers ordained since the organisation of the church are as follows:

The original Church building was remodeled in 1945, adding Sunday School romms. In September, 1957, the church voted to build a completely new building. Plans were started and by the summer of 1958 the building was complete. On August 9, 1958 the first services were held with Rev. E. V. Bumgarner as guest minister.

CHALLENGE TO CHURCH

COMPROMISES - EXODUS 10: 24-26

INTRODUCTION:

This is the age of compromise. Its baneful influence touches every phase of human life. You find it in the <u>Commercial</u> world, <u>Political</u> world and Religious world.

From the beginning it has been Satan's method, not to repudiate God's plan, but to adulterate it. He did not suggest to Cain not to erect an alter and offer no sacrifice, but that he substitute the fruit of the ground for a lamb from the flock. Read your history and in every great apostary in Isreal and you will find that in every case it was not the omission of worship, but the substitution of something else for the plain commandments of God. Even in the dark ages religion abounds everywhere, but instead of faith it was ritual. People bowed down to images, and offered worship instead of the Eternal God. Modernist are seeking to carry on this same form today. From the text let us see how this worship is still being carried on today. There are four compromises and the answer of consecration to each.

I. Compromises Suggested:

- A. "Go worship your God in the land." (Exodus 8: 25)
 - 1. Worship in Egypt
 - Act like a devout Hebrew or Christian on Sunday but do as you please the rest of the week.

- B. "Go, but don't go very far." (Exodus 8: 28)
 - 1. Become a church member but don't be an extremist.
 - 2. Sunday Morning Service is enough and contribute a dollar now and then but not too much.
- C. "Go ye that are men and serve Jehovah." (Exodus 10:11)
 - Don't bother about your family getting involved.
 - 2. Satan knows many are lead back into sin by non Christians in the family. (Husband or Wife)
- D. "Go and take your little ones with you; only let your cattle remain." (exodus 10: 24)
 - Let the family be religious but leave your possessions or business in Egypt.
 - Money talks, but what is yours saying, is it tell to people around the world the story of Jesus.

II. The Answer of Consecration. (Text)

- A. It was a complete defiance of Pharoah.
- B. It was a refusal to leave behind in Egypt anything that might later be used by the enemy.
- C. We will need our possession to offer sacrifices to God.
- D. Will you make the resolution Moses made?

SUGGESTIONS FOR ANNUAL ASSOCIATIONAL EVANGELISM REPORT - 1969

The simultaneous revival meetings held last spring as a part of the Crusade of the Americas bore evidence, in some places across the state, of being-genuine spiritual revivals. Where God's people sowed bountifully, they reaped gloriously. In our association the Crusade was (add your evaluation of it, giving additions by baptism and letter).

As we face the future in evangelism we should take note of what happened this year where outstanding revivals were experienced. This will give some guidelines for future plans in evangelism. As observed across the state some of the Characteristics were:

In every church where an unusual revival was reported there
had been an unusual prayer concern and prayer participation

across several months on the part of some church people-usually the leaders. This definitely says something to us for the future.

2. Some of the most powerful revivals in our state started among the young people of our churches. Young people are prominent in many places today (mostly in worldly places), and it is emcouraging to know that when they offer themselves to God to be used in His purpose, as many are doing, that revivals break forth in the churches. This has taken place in several churches in North Carolina this year. It ought to be happening everywhere.

In the light of what we have seen this year, here are some "<u>musts</u>" for the future:

- To seek earnestly to be completely assured in our hearts and minds that the only hope for us and all people is Christ --Christ as He and His gospel are revealed by the Holy Spirit through the Bible, the inspired and inerrant Word of God.
- 2. To purpose to engage daily in searching the Scriptures and in praying for spiritual revival in the churches. Some have made a beginning in this vital matter and all other Christians should join them and continue steadfastly therin.
- To proclaim faithfully "publicly and from house to house" (Acts 20:20) the glorious gospel of Christ, and to make this purpose central in all church plans, programs and activities.

1968 ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT

Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention

Important Date for all New Members in Plan "A"

The three-plan Southern Baptist Protection Program has one provision in Plan "A" that will affect all prospective new members soon; this provision is called "Delayed Participation," commonly known as a "grace period." The grace period provision will become effective on January 1, 1969. The provision states that the grace date is established in one of three ways: (1) as of January 1, 1969; (2) on the member's 26th birthday; or (3) one year from the date he first becomes eligible, whichever is the latter. This simply means that if a member joins Plan "A" of the Protection Program later than his grace date, the disability,

widow, child, education and dependent parent benefits will be proportionally reduced. The reduction will be the ratio which such years of delay bear to the total years from the grace date to the normal retirement date. Therefore, it is important that all who are now eligible join the Program before January 1, 1969.

Response to the New Program has been good. During 1967, 3,146 members joined some part of the three-plan Program. The plans in the Protection Program are: Plan "A," formerly called the Southern Baptist Protection Plan, and the plan in which benefits were increased and new ones added; Plan "B," the Age Security Plan; and Plan "C," the Variable Benefit Plan.

Information about the Protection Program, including the "grace period" provision, may be obtained from the annuity secretary in your state at the Baptist Building, or from the Development Division, Annuity Board, SBC, 511 North Akard Building, Dallas, Texas 75201.

Annuitants Receive "13th" Check

For the second consecutive year, all persons receiving a life benefit were mailed a "13th" check. Each check was for an amount equal to 12 per cent of his annual benefit. These checks were made possible because of interest earnings in excess of what the plans required. The trustees approved, two years ago, the issuance of the "13th" checks, providing the Board realized such excess interest earnings.

Dues on Total Salary Encouraged

Inflation continues to affect the buying power of the dollar for everyone, including those who have retired. No sign of a leveling off period of the inflationary trend is indicated. The Protection Program is designed to help any church provide as much retirement income for the minister and staff as it desires. Many churches are moving to ten per cent dues on total salary, recommended as a minimum by the Annuity Board and state convention secretaries.

REPORT for 1967

As of December 31, 1967, 1,202 new members had been issued certificates in Plan "A" of the Protection Program. A total number of 17,400 churches were providing the Program for their ministers.

Of the 174 agencies in the state conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention, 145 were providing the Program. The total number of employes

covered in the agency programs was 7,140.

Rev. Guy Cain promotes the Protection Program in North Carolina. He is jointly employed by the Annuity Board and North Carolina Baptist Convention. CONSTITUTION

Name

ARTICLE I

This Union of Churches shall be known as the Rocky Face Baptist Association.

Purpose

ARTICLE II

The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men. It shall strive, as far as possible to aid in the development of the churches which constitute its membership. Each church shall be free to support such mission work as it feels led; however, every church is urged to comply with the teaching of the scriptures concerning missions.

Membership

ARTICLE III

The membership of this Association shall be comprised of Missionary Baptist Churches and sponsored missions.

Churches or missions desiring affiliation with this Association, upon proper notice to the Association Executive Committee, shall be taken under the watchcare of the Association for one year; thence into membership.

All affiliated churches and missions shall be expected to cooperate in all associational programs of work.

Each church or mission may be represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association by at least three (3) messengers elected by the church from its active membership. Messengers shall be limited to a basis of 1-50 members after the basic three messengers (basic three messengers to equal the first 150 membership).

Affiliation

ARTICLE IV

This Association shall be affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and in turn with the Southern Baptist Convention.

Meeting

ARTICLE V

This Association shall hold an annual meeting the last Wednesday and Thursday in October of each year, the Thursday session to be a night session. Quarterly conferences shall be held in the first Sunday afternoon of each quarter. The Executive Committee may call other meetings if deemed necessary.

Officers

ARTICLE VI

The officers of the Association shall be:

(1) A Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk Treasurer, Historian, Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Directory, and W. M. U. President.

(2) The above officers are to be elected on the first day of the Annual Session and shall take charge at the close of the Session. Officers may be re-elected to successive terms if agreeable with both Association and officers

(3) All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee.
 (4) An Executive Committee shall be constituted of the following:

a. The pastor of each church or mission affiliated with the Association.

 One Laymen elected by each church from its active membership.

 Any other General Associational officer not herein under covered.

d. The committee shall elect chairman from its own group.

Powers

ARTICLE VII

The powers of this body shall be kept in strick conformity with New Testament principles.

The association cannot obligate or bind any church in any matter.
 The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise loardship over God's heritage.

(3) It shall act only as an advisory council in all metters. Then only

when called upon by the churches.

(4) Any church of the Association may appeal to the Association through

the Executive Committee for advice.

(5) The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until charges are brought against it by some other church and carefully considered by the Executive Committee of the Association.

(6) The officers of the Association shall be expected to promote withn the Association the duties of their office. It shall be their responsibility to contact, encourage and promote the work among the churches.

(7) The Association shall have no power over the Ordination of linisters or the organization of new churches, unless help is requested by

nterested parties.
(8) All matters to be considered at the Annual Session shall be preented to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to Annual Session.

(9) All decisions shall be reached by majority vote of messengers

resent at the session.

(10) Each messenger to exercise his voting priviledge must register ith the clerk and wear his registration tag. An alternate voting in the lace of a messenger must do likewise.

Committees

RTICLE VIII

The Nominating Committee shall at the beginning of each Annual Session resent to the body a slate of the following committees and or officers.

(1) A slate of General Officers listed herein under.

(2) Program Committee-Annual Session-5 members (Vice Moderator, Clerk,

ne Pastor and two Laymen).

- (3) Time, Place, Preacher 3 members (any church wishing to invite the ssociation for the next Annual Session, shall do so by filing a written intation with the clerk one month before the immediate session).
 - 4) A new Committee on Nominations 5 members.

(5) Resolutions - 3 members

(6) The report of the Nomination Committee shall be printed in sufficent number for distribution at the Annual Session. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to contact each person that is placed before the ody for elections, to secure their assent.

BY-LAWS

RTICLE I

All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer.

RTICLE II

The enrolled messengers present will constitute a quorum to transact usiness in the name of the Association.

Duties of Officers

RTICLE III

(1) Moderator - preside at the meeting, preserve order, appoint any ommittees as deemed necessary and exercise all other duties of a presiding fficer.

The Book of Parliamentary Procedures by Keerfoot shall be the basis of ruling order.

He shall, so far as his private duties permit, communicate with the

churches promoting the work of the Kingdom.

(2) Vice Moderator - preside in the absence or at the invitation of the Moderator. Perform all other duties common to moderator at his instruction.

(3) Clerk - keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distribution of the same. One month following the Annual Association Meeting the clerk shall forward to the printer all material then in his possession for the printing of the minutes. The minutes are to be printed whether or not all church letters have been received at that time.

He shall be paid \$50.00 annually for his services.

(4) Treasurer - it shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and distribute all funds connected with the work of the Association as directed by the body, and to make an annual statement of the same.

All money paid into the Association treasury shall be acceptable

by check only.

The treasurer shall be paid \$1.25 per hour for the number of hours actually spent discharging the work for the Association.

The treasurer shall act as the secretary for the Association.

(5) Historian - it shall be the duty of the Historian to prepare for publication in the minutes a historical sketch of the church with whom the day session is held.

(6) Sunday School Superintendent, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W. M. U. President - it shall be their duty to promote their respective work among the churches and at the associational level.

Duties of Committees

ATRICLE IV

(1) Program: (Annual Session) It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare and publish at least 60 days prior to Annual Session the program agenda. A verbal commitment must be received from all participates on the program. In event a speaker cannot fill his commitment, it shall be his responsibility to notify the committee, in advance of the session, except in extreme emergencies.

(Quarterly Conference) - To prepare an appropriate, informative and inspirational program. The committee shall use its own discretion as

to program material.

(2) Time, Place, and Preacher - it shall be the duty of the committee to select the place of the next Annual Session, to fix the time, name of the preacher and alternate to preach the Annual Sermon. (see No. 3, Article VIII of Constitution).

(3) Nominations - it shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to nominate the officers of the Association as well as standing committee members. This committee shall report to the Executive Committee at least 60 days prior to the Annual Session.

(4) Resolutions - it shall be the duty of the Committee on Resolutions to prepare and propose to the Association resolutions of appreciation to the host church, and consider any other matters referred to it by the moderator.

ARTICLE V

The expenses of the Association shall be provided for by the churches. Each church in the Association shall be expected to share in this provision of funds.

All money coming into the Association shall be directed to the treasurer. For the sake of clarity the clerk shall advise each church at least 30 days prior to the Annual Session concerning the cost per copy of Associational Minutes.

ARTICLE VI

Any motion for Associational or Executive Committee consideration must be presented in writing, at the time it is presented verbally, for consideration by the body or committee.

ARTICLE VII

It shall be the responsibility of the clerk to insert at the proper place in the printed minutes any new motion concerning constitution, By-Laws or Policy that may be adopted.

ARTICLE VIII

The Constitution and By-Laws may be changed or ammended or revised at any regular session if a majority of the messengers concur, provided the notice under Article VII of the Constitution has been given.

REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC. 1970

Under the impact of the life, ministry and teachings of Christ and under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, North Carolina Baptists, eighty-five years ago launched a Christian ministry of child care. This has grown considerably and is widely recognized for its qualities of service and pioneering spirit. Sons and daughters of the Children's Homes are scattered throughout the world.

They are actively engaged in all walks of life and are making a significant contribution to the uplift of mankind as a result of their early Christian training made possible by North Carolina Baptists and other friends.

The Children's Homes, through a variety of quality services, is recognized as a family service agency. This is made possible by well trained and professional staff who provide leadership for group care programs, foster home care, family services, consultation with churches in preschool programs and planning for higher education of children who have been in care. This program unfolds on seven campuses and through the work of regional casework centers throughout the state.

Broyhill Home at Waynesville and the Maternity Home at Asheville are scheduled to open within the next few months extending our ministry into Western North Carolina. In the East, Odum Home at Pembroke continues its vital ministry and Kennedy Home at Kinston is entering its intensive development program. Our ministry in Piedmont North Carolina focuses in Mills Home at Thomasville, Greer Home at Chapel Hill, and Wall Home at Wallburg.

You would be thrilled to see the progress our boys and girls make as they emerge out of difficult and unfortunate circumstances over which they have no control. Through this ministry you can find personal joy and excitement in helping people.

The contribution of our Baptist people through the Cooperative Program, the Thanksgiving Offering and special gifts are essential to our continued operation and are received with deep appreciation. An increasing number of friends are finding a rewarding stewardship opportunity through the establishment of trusts for the Homes and by means of wills and estate planning for the needs of dependent children. Members of the staff are available for consultation in estate planning and the preparation of wills.

Members of the Board of Trustees and members of the staff of the Homes are dedicated to a program of child care that will merit the undivided loyalty and support of our people and that will be worthy the blessings of our Lord. We convenant with you to face the future as we have the past: to offer Christian nurture to children in distress in the name of Christ our Savior and Lord.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING 1970

God has blessed our Homes for the Aging through all of our nineteen years, and during the past year in a very special way. We acknowledge His goodness and thank Him for every manifestation of His love. We also want to express sincere gratitude to our Baptist people for their increased love and concern for the 195 dear elderly people to whom we are ministering in our five Baptist Homes - Resthaven, the Hayes Home, and Nursing Care Unit, in Winston-Salem; the Albermarle Home, in Albermarle; the Hamilton Home, in Hamilton; and the Yanceyville Home, in Yanceyville.

An urgent appeal was made to our Baptist people before our offering in February to help us reduce the alarming deficit in the operation of the Homes. This plea was heard, and the offering, of \$168,349.34, from July 1, 1969 through June 30, 1970 from our Baptist Churches, has exceeded all other offerings in previous years. How grateful we are for this increase. We want to urge our people, however, to continue giving liberally to our Homes and to remember that we are still confronted with the staggering cost of living and the great need to strengthen the total economy of the Homes as we try to move forward in developing and expanding this vital ministry to the aging. For example, even though our offering reflects an increase over the previous year, this increase will only take care of approximately half of the additonal amount necessary in operating the Homes for the coming year, due to inflationary pressures.

Of great interest in our Development Program is a proposed new addition to our present Nursing Care Unit. Judge and Mrs. William M. York, of Greensboro, North Carolina, have offered a gift of \$80,000.00 to the Homes for this purpose, contingent upon the Homes raising an addition \$80,000.00 by September 1, 1970. If this proposal is fulfilled, 10 to 12 additional rooms would be made available, with accommodations for 20 to 24 people, and bringing our total nursing care capacity to 80 beds. We appeal to Baptist people to pray for the success of this very special project in the care of our elderly sick.

There is no greater security for an older person than that of the Christian nurture and love offered in our Baptist Homes, and we thank the Lord, and our Baptist people, for this ministry. We shall continue to look to Him, and to our people, on behalf of these to whom Christian love means so much, in the faith that our needs will be supplied.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Our Baptist Hospital continues to grow, in spite of its serious problems. hysical growth is the result of the long-range development program which has iready seen the completion of the new power plant, the School of Nursing and llied Health Building, and the additions to the Medical School. Construction f the new patient tower is progressing, after some delays, and is expected o be completed by mid-1972.

There is continued growth in the quality of patient care provided. There s improved equipment in the heart diagnostic center in the fight against eart disease; the department of nuclear medicine continues to make progress n the diagnosis and treatment of some of our most dreaded diseases; the troke center renders valuable service in the study and treatment of strokes nd brain tumors. New equipment for the Intensive Care unit includes an intrument which is attached to the patient and measures his heat action and lood pressure; if either varies from a safe range the machine signals the ttendant immediately.

Changes in admission procedures have been made necessary by the financial risis the hospital faces. When a doctor reserves a bed for a patient the dmissions office contacts the patient to obtain the needed information, inluding the type and amount of his hospital insurance coverage. After estiating the hospital bill and determining the amount of insurance coverage, he patient is notified of the difference which he is expected to bring hen he enters the hospital. An effort is made to counsel with all patients no need financial aid and assist them in getting help.

With all the growth, one thing remains unchanged: the desire and deterination to care for the needy sick. This has been at the heart of the ospital's ministry since it opened in 1923. Last year it ministered to ,225 Service Patients for 47,499 days of hospital care, in addition to the arge number served in the Outpatient Clinics. The free care amounted to one than a million dollars beyond what these patients, their insurance, and all sponsoring agencies paid. North Carolina Baptists provided \$565,000 f this amount - \$237,000 through the Cooperative Program and \$328,000 rough the Mother's Day Offering. To date this year eleven churches in our sociation contributed \$7,041.42 of the Mother's Day Fund, thus helping the hospital keep faith with its purpose.

Though our Mother's Day Offerings have grown they have not kept pace with the rising costs and our hospital is running a heavy deficit. If full use is to be made of the new medical procedures and facilities in fulfilling our mission, we are going to have to give our Baptist Hospital additional support.

THE 1970 ASSOCIATIONAL FOUNDATION REPORT

The fact that the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. has tripled its assets during the past eight years is proof that this service arm of the Convention has found favor with North Carolina Baptists.

Since the Foundation was reactivated in 1966, assets have increased from \$350,000 to more than one million dollars. This includes trust funds and real estate.

THE FOUNDATION advances the Kingdom of God in two major ways: by serving individuals and by serving Baptist agencies and institutions. This includes the Cooperative Program, Missions, High Education, the Baptist Hospital, and Baptist Homes for the Aging.

Special Emphasis on Trusts and Wills

THE FOUNDATION has again this year put a major interest on the making of wills.

Many churches have used the facilities of the Foundation to conduct will clinics, and reports from these clinics indicate that they have been very successful.

THE FOUNDATION also has an opportunity to counsel with many people concerning their own wills, and in some instances has provided the information and direction necessary for inclusion of Baptist causes in their will.

THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION has had a most successful year, is on the move, and is rendering service to individual Baptists in a concrete way.

PLEASANT GROVE CHURCH HISTORY

On December 1, 1900, a Presbytery consisting of Elders J. P. Gwaltney, E. N. Gwyn, and A. H. Goodin; with Brethren N. G. Sloan and others from Damascus Baptist Church met at Rocky Branch Schoolhouse to organize a new church to be known as Pleasant Grove Baptist Church. There were 21 charter members, representing 5 families. None of the charter members are living; however, over 50 direct descendants of the charter members are at present members of Pleasant Grove, and all but one of the five original families are represented.

The church seems to have been the outgrowth of two main factors; (1) Some families who felt existing churches were too far away; and (2) The interest in establishing a Baptist Church in this community as a result of a revival held by Brother J. P. Gwaltney in a Brush Arbor on the old Adams place near the present Harris Bridge on the Stony Point Road.

Elder J. P. Gwaltney was called to serve as the first pastor; and E. S. Millsaps was elected clerk. The first preaching service was held on Sunday at Mt. Pisgah Church. Other pastors who have serve the church are: Elder R. L.Davis, Rev. T. E. Redman, Rev. J. M. Brinkley, Rev. T. H. Williams, Rev. L. E. Barnes, Rev. G. D. White (who served the longest term of 25½ years), Rev. Charles F. Cook, and the present pastor, Rev. M. A. McCurdy.

In January 1901, R. W. Grant, J. J. Levan, and F. M. Teague were appointed as Board of Trustees. In August 1901, the church voted to apply to the Alexander Association for membership; and in 1949, the church joined the newly formed Rocky Face Association. The first record of a Revival meeting was in August 1903, and the pastor was assisted by Elder R. L. Davis. Discipline was strict in the early days and there are several instances on record where the Clerk was asked to notify absent members to fill their seats at the next meeting. Perhaps a good idea for present day churches to adopt!

In September 1904, the first church house was completed. The first meeting held in it was the beginning of Revival services. This building was next to Rocky Branch School and where our present parking lot is. The Dedication was held on May 14, 1905, the sermon being preached by Bro. W. R. Gwaltney. That building was used until 1950, when the present building was completed. The first service in this building was held on the first Sunday in August, and was well attended since it was Homecoming Sunday, the beginning of the Revival, and also Pastor G. D. White's birthday dinner. The church voted in 1959 to build an addition to the back of the church for more Sunday School rooms. Work started that year and it was built mainly by the church members with the help of friends, as was the original building. Before the addition was completely finished, we took time out to build a parsonage, which was occupied in November 1962.

We have not been able to determine whether Sunday School was held from the beginning of the church; however, according to the Associational Minutes it was going strong in 1911 with 63 enrolled. Apparently it has been true through the years, as it is today, that a large proportion of the Sunday School enrolled is young people; this has been an asset to the church although we sometimes have been hard pressed to find teachers for all of the classes.

Ministers ordained by this church are: Wayne Levan, Paul Levan, and Kenneth Childers.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

The purpose of Gods people is evangelizing the word for Jesus. This means making desciples. Teaching them and baptizing them into the fellowship of the church. Therefore Evangelism is to make desciples and mature them. This is Gods purpose and plan. Let us therefore be encouraged in His work. Soul-winning is the heart-line of the church. Jesus taught us in Matthew 28:19-20

"Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world, A-men."

Your church would not think of trying to carry out its mission without literature devoted to the Sunday School, Church Training, WMU, Brotherhood and all other church organizations.
