#### CONSTITUTION

Name

#### ARTICLE I

This Union of Churches shall be known as the Rocky Face Baptist Association.

#### Purpose

#### ARTICLE II

The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men. It shall strive, as far as possible to aid in the development of the churches which constitute its membership. Each church shall be free to support such mission work as it feels led; however, every church is urged to comply with the teaching of the scriptures concerning missions.

#### Membership

#### ARTICLE III

The membership of this Association shall be comprised of Missionary Baptist Churches and sponsored missions.

Churches or missions desiring affiliation with this Association, upon proper notice to the Association Executive Committee, shall be taken under the watchcare of the Association for one year; thence into membership.

All affiliated churches and missions shall be expected to cooperate in all associational programs of work.

Each church or mission may be represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association by at least three (3) messengers elected by the church from its active membership. Messengers shall be limited to a basis of 1-50 members after the basic three messengers (basic three messengers to equal the first 150 membership).

## Affiliation

#### ARTICLE IV

This Association shall be affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and in turn with the Southern Baptist Convention.

### Meeting

#### ARTICLE V

This Association shall hold an annual meeting the last Wednesday and Thursday in October of each year, the Thursday session to be a night session. Quarterly conferences shall be held in the first Sunday afternoon of each quarter. The Executive Committee may call other meetings if deemed necessary.

#### Officers

#### ARTICLE VI

The officers of the Association shall be:

- (1) A Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk Treasurer, Historian, Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Directory, and W. M. U. President.
- (2) The above officers are to be elected on the first day of the Annual Session and shall take charge at the close of the Session. Officers may be re-elected to successive terms if agreeable with both Association and officers.
  - (3) All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee.
  - An Executive Committee shall be constituted of the following:
     a. The pastor of each church or mission affiliated
    - with the Association.
      b. One Laymen elected by each church from its active
    - membership.
      c. Any other General Associational officer not herein
    - under covered.
    - The committee shall elect chairman from its own group.

#### Powers

#### ARTICLE VII

The powers of this body shall be kept in strick conformity with New Testament principles.

- (1) The association cannot obligate or bind any church in any matter.
- (2) The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise loardship over God's heritage.
- (3) It shall act only as an advisory council in all metters. Then only when called upon by the churches.
- (4) Any church of the Association may appeal to the Association through
- the Executive Committee for advice.
- (5) The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until charges are brought against it by some other church and carefully considered by the Executive Committee of the Association.

(6) The officers of the Association shall be expected to promote within the Association the duties of their office. It shall be their responsibility to contact, encourage and promote the work among the churches.

(7) The Association shall have no power over the Ordination of Ministers or the organization of new churches, unless help is requested by

interested parties.

(8) All matters to be considered at the Annual Session shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to Annual Session.

(9) All decisions shall be reached by majority vote of messengers

present at the session.

(10) Each messenger to exercise his voting priviledge must register with the clerk and wear his registration tag. An alternate voting in the place of a messenger must do likewise.

#### Committees

#### ARTICLE VIII

The Nominating Committee shall at the beginning of each Annual Session present to the body a slate of the following committees and or officers.

(1) A slate of General Officers listed herein under.

(2) Program Committee-Annual Session-5 members (Vice Moderator, Clerk,

one Pastor and two Laymen).

- (3) Time, Place, Preacher 3 members (any church wishing to invite the Association for the next Annual Session, shall do so by filing a written invitation with the clerk one month before the immediate session).
  - (4) A new Committee on Nominations 5 members.

5) Resolutions - 3 members

(6) The report of the Nomination Committee shall be printed in sufficient number for distribution at the Annual Session. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to contact each person that is placed before the body for elections, to secure their assent.

#### BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE I

All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer.

#### ARTICLE II

The enrolled messengers present will constitute a quorum to transact business in the name of the Association.

## Duties of Officers

#### ARTICLE III

(1) Moderator - preside at the meeting, preserve order, appoint any committees as deemed necessary and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer.

The Book of Parliamentary Procedures by Keerfoot shall be the basis of ruling order.

He shall, so far as his private duties permit, communicate with the

churches promoting the work of the Kinadom.

(2) Vice Moderator - preside in the absence or at the invitation of the

Moderator. Perform all other duties common to moderator at his instruction.

(3) Clerk - keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distribution of the same. One month following the Annual Association Meeting the clerk shall forward to the printer all material then in his possession for the printing of the minutes. The minutes are to be printed whether or not all church letters have been received at that time.

He shall be paid \$50.00 annually for his services.

(4) Treasurer - it shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and distribute all funds connected with the work of the Association as directed by the body, and to make an annual statement of the same.

All money paid into the Association treasury shall be acceptable

by check only.

The treasurer shall be paid \$1.25 per hour for the number of hours actually spent discharging the work for the Association.

The treasurer shall act as the secretary for the Association. Historian - it shall be the duty of the Historian to prepare for publication in the minutes a historical sketch of the church with whom the

day session is held.

Sunday School Superintendent, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W. M. U. President - it shall be their duty to promote their respective work among the churches and at the associational level.

#### Duties of Committees

#### ATRICLE IV

(1) Program: (Annual Session) It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare and publish at least 60 days prior to Annual Session the program agenda. A verbal commitment must be received from all participates on the program. In event a speaker cannot fill his commitment, it shall be his responsibility to notify the committee, in advance of the session, except in extreme emergencies.

(Quarterly Conference) - To prepare an appropriate, informative and inspirational program. The committee shall use its own discretion as

to program material.

(2) Time, Place, and Preacher - it shall be the duty of the committee to select the place of the next Annual Session, to fix the time, name of the preacher and alternate to preach the Annual Sermon. (see No. 3, Article VIII

of Constitution).

(3) Nominations - it shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to nominate the officers of the Association as well as standing committee members. This committee shall report to the Executive Committee at least 60 days prior to the Annual Session.

(4) Resolutions - it shall be the duty of the Committee on Resolutions to prepare and propose to the Association resolutions of appreciation to the host church, and consider any other matters referred to it by the moderator.

#### ARTICLE V

The expenses of the Association shall be provided for by the churches. Each church in the Association shall be expected to share in this provision of funds.

All money coming into the Association shall be directed to the treasurer. For the sake of clarity the clerk shall advise each church at least 30 days prior to the Annual Session concerning the cost per copy of Associational Minutes.

#### ARTICLE VI

Any motion for Associational or Executive Committee consideration must be presented in writing, at the time it is presented verbally, for consideration by the body or committee.

#### ARTICLE VII

It shall be the responsibility of the clerk to insert at the proper place in the printed minutes any new motion concerning constitution, By-Laws or Policy that may be adopted.

#### ARTICLE VIII

The Constitution and By-Laws may be changed or ammended or revised at any regular session if a majority of the messengers concur, provided the notice under Article VII of the Constitution has been given.

#### NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

Our North CArolina Baptist Homes for the Aging celebrated their 20th anniversary in March of this year. During these two decades, the story of our Homes has been one of faith and the abundant blessings of God upon this pecial ministry to older people. God has brought us from one Home, and one resident in 1951, to five Homes and a Nursing Care Unit, with total accommodations for 160 residents and 76 patients. Two of these Homes, Resthaven and the Hayes Home, and the Nursing Care Unit are located in Winston-Salem, and the other three Homes are located in Albermarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville. In these Homes, our residents are loved, and we feel that there is no greater security that they could have and no better care that they could receive.

The past year has been one of the best ever, and we are rejoicing in the blessings that have come from God through our Baptist people. Support for the Homes from the churches, through the Cooperative Program and the Special Day Offering, has been most encouraging. For the last three years, the Homes have had an alarming deficit and have operated in the red.

We have not yet reached the point of operating in the black, but let us say, with hopeful optimism, that we are approaching this time. The deepened concern of our Baptist People and the increase in gifts have been strong contributing factors to the success of the past year.

At least 80% of the people who live in our Baptist Homes are financially needy persons and benefit directly from the love gifts of North Carolina Baptists. They simply could not be maintained, and the Homes could not be operated without the Special Offering, designated gifts from the churches, and the Cooperative Program. We would urge our Baptist people, therefore, to remember how dependent these dear older people are on them and would challenge them to give more liberally than ever and to see that their gifts are a real life-line in the on-going of this ministry.

Of unusual interest during the past year has been the construction of the new addition to the Nursing Care Unit in Winston-Salem. It is anticipated that this new facility will be ready for occupancy by September 1. It will make available 20 additional beds and bring the total capacity of the Nursing Care Unit to 76. This addition was made possible by the generous challeng gift of \$80,000.00 from Judge and Mrs. William York, of Greensboro. The trustees accepted the challenge and raised an additional \$80,000.00.

Pray for your Baptist Homes for the Aging and remember that any ministry to an older person in the name of Christ is a direct ministry to Him.

## BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Your Baptist Hospital admitted 17,557 persons in 1970 for a total of 150,174 days of care. In addition, there were 51,563 visits to outpatient clinics, including 17,241 to the Emergency Room. About 90% of these were "referral" patients-that is, patients who were referred to our Hospital by their local physicians because they needed the specialized medical care our Hospital is staffed and equipped to offer.

Our Hospital, from the day of its beginning, has provided good medical care for our people, including care for persons who cannot pay the cost. There has been great progress in medicine and tremendous increase in hospital costs, and these have made some policy changes necessary. The basic policy of providing care now the highly specialized care for the more difficult cases -- for those who cannot pay has not changed. This Christian ministry is at the heart of the work of our Baptist Hospital.

The financial situation of the Hospital is viewed by the administration with "cautious optimism". The operation deficit has been reduced and expenditures are being kept more nearly in line with income. The entire staff is cooperating in an effort to maintain a proper balance between sound financial policies and a spirit of Christian compassion.

The Medical Center Development Program is progressing on schedule. The new patient Tower is expected to be ready for partial occupancy by late 1972. The 14 bed coronary care unit

will open about September, 1971. A state wide Development Campaign, initiated with pledges totaling \$177,182 from employees of the Medical Center, is moving toward successful completion.

Baptist Hospital offers a ministry of healing in Christ's name to all who need it. It seeks to fulfill the same purpose in North Carolina that a Baptist Hospital operated by our Foreign Mission Board seeds to fulfill in Korea or Nigeria. It ought to be supported by missionary-minded Baptists with the same enthusiasm and for the same reason we support every other phase of our denomination's World Mission Program. This is missions too.

## BAPTIST HOSPITAL'S USE OF MORTHER'S DAY FUND

The Hospital's Mother's Day Fund is used for one purpose alone, that of helping to pay the cost of caring for those persons who need the care of our Medical Center and cannot pay their way. It would be too much to expect that it would never be abused, but the Hospital tries to take every precaution possible to see that these offerings are not used for undeserving cases. The fact is, the cost of caring for those whose needs are very great, and who simply have no way of paying their way, is far beyond beth the Mother's Day Fund and the Hospital's share of the Cooperative Program.

Since Baptist Hospital is a referral medical center, a large per cent of its patients are long term cases with complex medical problems, many of whom have had long expensive medical care before they get to us. In many cases both money and insurance are exhausted. If it appears that adequate resources are not available, athe first step is to make every possible effort to get the patient sponsored by one of the several health agencies. The Mother's Day Fund is not used until the patient's resources and all other sources of help are exhausted.

Many of the most expensive cases which have to have help ome to the Hospital thinking that they can take care of the lost. Then it is discovered that the problem is more serious han expected and long expensive hospitalization follows. The particular think when they leave the Hospital that they will also able to pay, only to discover later that because of health of other conditions they are unable to do so. Then, of course, here are some who when they promise to pay do not expect to deep their promise. Many of these persons fail to reply to communications, some deliberately and some because of personal imitations, and the Hospital cannot determine whether it is case of need or a refusal to meet one's just obligations.

If the Hospital after prolonged effort is unable to get by response in these cases the account is placed in the hands of a collecting agency. Only then is it discovered that some of mese persons are the victims of circumstances which make it appossible to pay. And even them, it is sometimes impossible to determine whether it is a case of "cannot" or a case of will not". Because of this, the Hospital does not go to the ctra expense of trying to classify those who just refuse to ay and separate their records from those who are helped because their genuine need. The Credit Bureau, however, does classify "poor credit risks" those from whom they are unable to colect, unless it is discovered that they are cases of genuine edd.

The end result is that most of the "free service" reported the Hospital represents money spent in caring for sick peole who needed the specialized care or our Medical Center and imply could not pay the cost. This means that the Mother's ay Offerings and the Cooperative Program funds are vital to is part of North Carolina Baptists' missionary outreach.

# BAPTIST HOSPITAL -- A REFERRAL HOSPITAL

Our Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem is primarily a "referral" hospital. That is, most of its patients, about 90% of them, are referred here by their local physicians because their local hospitals do not have the specialized medical personnel and equipment to diagnose and treat rare and complicated medical problems. For example, patients with leukemia, severe burms, and respiratory diseases and those meeding openheart surgery or a kidney transplant, cannot be given the care they need in many hospitals and must be "referred" to a medical center which is staffed and equipped to meet such needs.

A "referral" hospital is usually a teaching hospital. By his we mean it is related to and works with a medical school, here physicians and other medical personnel are educated. pecialists in almost every field of medicine constitute the aculty of the school and serve also on the medical staff of he hospital. Baptist Hospital began to be a referral and teaching hospital in 1941 when the School of Medicine of Wake orest College (now University) moved to Winston-Salem from he old campus in Wake County. Located adjacent to Baptist ospital, the two institutions enjoy a close relationship of utual helpfulness. The Hospital provides clinical facilities or the Medical School's teaching program and the School's aculty serves as the medical staff of the Hospital.

For reasons that are fairly obvious, care in a referral ospital is more costly--usually about twice as costly--than n a local hospital. The need for highly specialized physitans, ohter health personnel such as therapists and techicians, and the need for elaborate equipment and expensive medications, make the cost higher.

Fortunately, most of our medical needs are simple enough hat they can be met in local hospitals located near us. But hen those special medical problems arise, we are grateful for facility like Baptist Hospital to which we may be "referred".

In one or two instances, individuals brough their wills haveadded of existing memorials that were stablished during the lifetime of the donor. The Foundation tands ready to render service to individuals and churches as heir requests are made known. We wish to serve you.

## FAIRVIEW BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

On Saturday, July 15, 1922, a Presbytery consisting of Rev. J. P. Gwaltney, Rev. L. E. Barnes, and Deacon J. A. Campbell, and others met in the old store building of Mr. and Mrs. Josiah P. Hendren's, located on Cheatham Ford Road, Route 1, Hiddenite, N. C., for the purpose of organizing a new church.

Rev. J. P. Gwaltney presented the name Fairview which was voted on and accepted by those present. Rev. L. E. Barnes was elected as pastor and Lester Query as church clerk. Hunter Blankenship was elected to be the first Sunday School Superintendent.

The following persons presented themselves as charter members, four of them are members at the present time: Flora L. Hendren Millsaps, Effie Hendren LeVan, William Baxter Hendren, L. Minnie Hendren, W. Clay Hendren, Josiah P. Hendren, Nettie Hendren, Datie Hendren Allen, Gay Hendren Matlock, Lester T. Query, Lessie C. Query, George S. Parker, Barbery L. Parker, Perlie Parker Millsaps, William S. Parker, Dorcas R. White, Mattie Meadows, and Florence Adams. Ten of these members are still living and eight are deceased.

The group used the old store building, which is now presently owned by Mrs. Florence Waugh, for their meeting place for approximately one year. Hunter Blankenship was in charge of Sunday School and Rev. L. E. Barnes served as pastor. In the latter part of 1922 and in 1923, Josiah P. and Nettie Hendren donated approximately two acres of land located near the old store building to the group of the purpose of constructing a brush arbor. This arbor was completed and used as their meeting place during the latter part of 1923. It was located to the far right of the present church building.

Then the group began to work toward a better meeting place and was able to complete a white frame structure and occupy it by 1924. This church building was located where the present church building now stands. In 1950, the group renovated the withe frame structure by adding five Sunday school rooms and two bathrooms, and by bricking the outside walls. In 1965, and 1966, additional Sunday school rooms were provided in the Basement and at the present time, some necessary renovation is being done.

The beginning church enrollment was 18. On September 16, 32, A motation was made in the minute book that the church rollment was 89. In October, 1959, this had increased to 202, October, 1967, this had increased to 214, and October, 1971, e church enrollment was 238. During 49 years the membership d increased by 220 members.

The church has been served by five pastors including Rev. E. Barnes from 1922 until 1929. Rev. Grady D. White was lled in 1930 and served until May 14, 1960. Rev. Charlie C. lland served as supply pastor during 1959 and 1960 due to v. White's health. Rev. James Sigmon was called June 18,1960, d served until October 8, 1961. Rev. John West was called rch 4, 1962, and served as pastor until October 27, 1963. v. Bill Dyson was called August 9, 1964, and is presently rving as pastor.

One minister has been licensed by this church, Namely il Branton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Branton, Route 1, ddenite, N. C. Phil accepted and announced his call to each January 31, 1971. The church requested that Phil be censed on March 28, 1971, and at the present time, he has t been ordained.

Saturday, July 15, 1972, will mark the Fiftieth Anniversary r Fairview Baptist Church.



#### CONSTITUTION

#### Name

#### ARTICLE I

This Union of Churches shall be known as the Rocky Face Baptist Association.

## Purpose

#### ARTICLE II

The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men. It shall strive, as far as possible to aid in the development of the churches which constitute its membership. Each church shall be free to support such mission work as it feels led; however, every church is urged to comply with the teaching of the scriptures concerning missions.

#### Membership

#### ARTICLE III

The membership of this Association shall be comprised of Missionary Baptist Churches and sponsored missions.

Churches or missions desiring affiliation with this Association, upon proper notice to the Association Executive Committee, shall be taken under the watchcare of the Association for one year; thence into membership.

All affiliated churches and missions shall be expected to cooperate in all associational programs of work.

Each church or mission may be represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association by at least three (3) messengers elected by the church from its active membership. Messengers shall be limited to a basis of 1-50 members after the basic three messengers (basic three messengers to equal the first 150 membership).

## Affiliation

#### ARTICLE IV

This Association shall be affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and in turn with the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### Meeting

#### ARTICLE V

This Association shall hold an annual meeting the last Wednesday and Thursday in October of each year, the Thursday session to be a night session. Quarterly conferences shall be held in the first Sunday afternoon of each quarter. The Executive Committee may call other meetings if deemed necessary.

#### Officers 0

#### ARTICLE VI

The officers of the Association shall be:

(1) A Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk Treasurer, Historian, Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Directory, and W. M. U. President.

(2) The above officers are to be elected on the first day of the Annual Session and shall take charge at the close of the Session. Officers may be re-elected to successive terms if agreeable with both Association and officers.

- (3) All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee.
  (4) An Executive Committee shall be constituted of the following:
  - a. The pastor of each church or mission affiliated with the Association.
  - One Laymen elected by each church from its active membership.
  - Any other General Associational officer not herein under covered.
  - The committee shall elect chairman from its own group.

#### Powers

## ARTICLE VII

The powers of this body shall be kept in strick conformity with New Testament principles.

- (1) The association cannot obligate or bind any church in any matter.(2) The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise loardship
- (2) The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise loardship over God's heritage.
- (3) It shall act only as an advisory council in all metters. Then only when called upon by the churches.
- (4) Any church of the Association may appeal to the Association through the Executive Committee for advice.
- (5) The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until charges are brought against it by some other church and carefully considered by the Executive Committee of the Association.

(6) The officers of the Association shall be expected to promote within the Association the duties of their office. It shall be their responsibility to contact, encourage and promote the work among the churches.

(7) The Association shall have no power over the Ordination of

Ministers or the organization of new churches, unless help is requested by

interested parties.

(8) All matters to be considered at the Annual Session shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to Annual Session.

(9) All decisions shall be reached by majority vote of messengers

present at the session.

(10) Each messenger to exercise his voting priviledge must register with the clerk and wear his registration tag. An alternate voting in the place of a messenger must do likewise.

#### Committees

#### ARTICLE VIII

The Nominating Committee shall at the beginning of each Annual Session present to the body a slate of the following committees and or officers.

(1) A slate of General Officers listed herein under.

(2) Program Committee-Annual Session-5 members (Vice Moderator, Clerk,

one Pastor and two Laymen).

(3) Time, Place, Preacher - 3 members (any church wishing to invite the Association for the next Annual Session, shall do so by filing a written invitation with the clerk one month before the immediate session).

(4) A new Committee on Nominations - 5 members.

Resolutions - 3 members
The report of the Nomination Committee shall be printed in sufficient number for distribution at the Annual Session. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to contact each person that is placed before the body for elections, to secure their assent.

#### BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE I

All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer.

#### ARTICLE II

The enrolled messengers present will constitute a quorum to transact business in the name of the Association.

#### Duties of Officers

#### ARTICLE III

(1) Moderator - preside at the meeting, preserve order, appoint any committees as deemed necessary and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer.

The Book of Parliamentary Procedures by Keerfoot shall be the basis of ruling order.

He shall, so far as his private duties permit, communicate with the

churches promoting the work of the Kingdom.

(2) Vice Moderator - preside in the absence or at the invitation of the Moderator. Perform all other duties common to moderator at his instruction.

(3) Clerk - keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distribution of the same. One month following the Annual Association Meeting the clerk shall forward to the printer all material then in his possession for the printing of the minutes. The minutes are to be printed whether or not all church letters have been received at that time.

He shall be paid \$50.00 annually for his services.

(4) Treasurer - it shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and distribute all funds connected with the work of the Association as directed by the body, and to make an annual statement of the same.

All money paid into the Association treasury shall be acceptable

by check only.

The treasurer shall be paid \$1.25 per hour for the number of hours actually spent discharging the work for the Association.

The treasurer shall act as the secretary for the Association. Historian - it shall be the duty of the Historian to prepare for publication in the minutes a historical sketch of the church with whom the

day session is held.

(6) Sunday School Superintendent, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W. M. U. President - it shall be their duty to promote their respective work among the churches and at the associational level.

#### Duties of Committees

#### ATRICLE IV

(1) Program: (Annual Session) It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare and publish at least 60 days prior to Annual Session the program agenda. A verbal commitment must be received from all participates on the program. In event a speaker cannot fill his commitment, it shall be his responsibility to notify the committee, in advance of the session, except in extreme emergencies.

(Quarterly Conference) - To prepare an appropriate, informative and inspirational program. The committee shall use its own discretion as

to program material.

(Ž) Time, Place, and Preacher - it shall be the duty of the committee to select the place of the next Annual Session, to fix the time, name of the preacher and alternate to preach the Annual Sermon. (see No. 3, Article VIII

of Constitution).

(3) Nominations - it shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to nominate the officers of the Association as well as standing committee members. This committee shall report to the Executive Committee at least 60 days prior to the Annual Session.

(4) Resolutions - it shall be the duty of the Committee on Resolutions to prepare and propose to the Association resolutions of appreciation to the host church, and consider any other matters referred to it by the moderator.

#### ARTICLE V

The expenses of the Association shall be provided for by the churches. Each church in the Association shall be expected to share in this provision of funds.

All money coming into the Association shall be directed to the treasurer. For the sake of clarity the clerk shall advise each church at least 30 days prior to the Annual Session concerning the cost per copy of Associational Minutes.

#### ARTICLE VI

Any motion for Associational or Executive Committee consideration must be presented in writing, at the time it is presented verbally, for consideration by the body or committee.

#### ARTICLE VII

It shall be the responsibility of the clerk to insert at the proper place in the printed minutes any new motion concerning constitution, By-Laws or Policy that may be adopted.

#### ARTICLE VIII

The Constitution and By-Laws may be changed or ammended or revised at any regular session if a majority of the messengers concur, provided the notice under Article VII of the Constitution has been given.

#### ANNUAL SERMON

SUBJECT: TREASURE & WHAT TO DO WITH IT

II Corinthians 4:7

#### Three Thoughts in Text

### REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

#### 1972

For the past eighty-seven years, North Carolina Baptist and their Children's Homes have cooperated in a program of Christian child care. The Homes have been sensitive to human need and have provided children with quality care. North Carolina Baptists have given generous and enthusiastic support to their child care ministry.

The agency is vigorously pursuing its basic purposes. Changing conditions which are affecting American life today are determining factors in the number of children needing our care and the types of care that are needed. More and more we are being asked to serve children with special needs beyond neglect and dependency. The urgency of the present and the challenge of the future is to find effective patterns of care for these children.

The Children's Homes continues to expand and improve its services to children and their families. Two new cottages are under construction at Broyhill Home. Mills Home is engaged in a year-long study to determine how we can best serve the children in the Piedmont Area. The Ten Star Builders' Program is enlisting the support of Eastern North Carolina for Christian child care in our area. Across the state, renewed effort is being given to the enlistment of foster families. Expanded services to families are being initiated.

One of the major tasks confronting our work in Eastern North Carolina is the upgrading of our campus facilities to meet minimum standards for licensing our child care program. Most of our older buildings at Kennedy Home will require extensive and expensive renovation to meet these standards. Some buildings may have to be completely replaced with new structures. To meet this urgent need, we ask our Baptist friends in Eastern North Carolina to give serious and prayerful thought to increased support for operating expenses and special bequests and donations for capital improvements.

We believe this ministry of child care deserves the confidence and support of North CArolina Baptists. Our Baptist friends have demonstrated though their interest and support that they believe in what we are doing. The Cooperative Program continues to be the lifeblood of our financial support. The 1971 Thanksgiving Offering channeled \$400,000 into our ministry of child care. Special gifts and bequests from individuals continue to provide for capital improvements. We deeply appreciate this generous support, and we pledge

ourselves to continue this ministry of child care in the name of Christ and on behalf of North Carolina Baptists.

I wish every church would visit the Childrens Home and see the wonderful work they are doing for these children. It would give you a greater desire to give more to the Children's Home, that they might help many more children that don't have homes.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

In our Baptist Homes for the Aging, we feel that there is no relationship more important and more blessed than the one that we have with our Baptist people in our Baptist Associations throughout the State. It is a special joy to visit personally the Associations and to have fellowship with the good people who mean so much to us in our ministry and to express to them our special thanksgiving. It is with a deep sense of gratitude to the Lord and to you that we bring this report on our Baptist for 1972.

This had been the best year that we have ever had in our twenty-one years. The Special Offering for the Homes and support through the Cooperative Program reflect an encouraging increase. Through these two vital sources, the Homes during the past year derived almost 30% of the total operating budget in the care of the residents and patients, with 20% coming from the offering, and 10% through the Cooperative Program. The most significant fact about this support from our Baptist people is that the majority of the residents in the Homes are persons with real financial needs, and these love gifts are used for their care. In fact, these gifts are a lifeline to the residents, and they could not be maintained without them. The greatest challenge to our Baptist people is to continue to increase the Special Offering from year to year, and thus keep pace with the needs of the residents, who depend so greatly on it.

Our Baptist Homes now operate five resident Homes, with two located in Winston-Salem, and one each in Albermarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville. These Homes have a capacity for 162 residents. In addition, there is a Nursing Care Unit, located in Winston-Salem, with a capacity for 63 patients. In these Homes we specialize in tender loving care and do not know of any place this side of Heaven, and outside of one's home, where a person can receive more compassionate Christian care.

#### BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO ASSOCIATIONS

The distinctiveness of Baptist Hospital's ministry lies not lone in its care for charity patients, but also in the type of ervice it renders to all its patients, and to many other people proughout our state and nation and around the world.

As an academic Medical Center it is engaged in research and education, as well as direct patient care. The ministry through esearch is far-reaching since new discoveries in medicine offer new ope to people everywhere. The educational ministry also extends round the world, since graducates of the Bowman Gray School of edicine serve in 88 counties of North Carolina, in 47 states and the istrict of Columbia, and in 25 different countries. Alumni of the chool of Pastoral Care serve in almost every state and in 39 other pointries.

The quality of direct patient care provided at Baptist Hospital distinct in at least two respects. First, it is a specialized type femedical care, provided for referral patients who have rare or complicated medical problems. Because of the highly-skilled specialists in most every area of medicine, and the elaborate equipment available for agnosis and treatment, we are able to provide the kind of care which is vailable only in a large medical center. Ours is one of only 108 such edical centers in the United States.

In addition to offering this kind of medical expertise, a second stinctive of our patient care is the Christian concern for the total rson with all his needs. This spirit is found among physicians, nurses, des, and other personnel throughout the Center. The Department of storal Care seeks to minister specifically to the spiritual and emotional eds of patients and their families.

Baptist Hospital does continue to serve patients who cannot pay for eir hospital care. Even with the tightening of admission policies and ocedures, only one person in twelve months--i.e., one in approximately ,000 applications for admissions--was not helped. In 1971, charitable lowances amounting to \$1,370,000 were issued to patients unable to pay full. The Mother's Day Offering of \$371,000 helped make this charity rk possible.

#### BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

The hospital takes pride in its record of charitable work, but would like to help our Baptist people to understand that there are other aspects of its work also which justify its existence as an institution of our Convention and make it worthy of the support of our churches.

The operating deficit has been eliminated and the hospital is now operating "in the black."

The new patient tower is being completed and some departments have already moved into the lower levels. Complete occupation should take place in January, 1973. One additional unit, a two story unit housing the emergency room and out-patient clinic, is scheduled to be completed by 1973. This will conclude the present development program.

"A Medical Center ministering with skill and understanding" is not just a letterhead slogan; it is a goal which Baptist Hospital seriously strives to attain.

Of great significance during the past year, in May, was the dedication of the York Wing of the Nursing Care Unit. This wing, accomodating 18 additional patients was completed in November of 1971 and named in honor of Judge and Mrs. William York, of Greensboro. He and Mrs. York gave \$80,000.00 for the construction of this new wing, and the additional money needed was raised by the Trustees of the Homes. With this new addition, the Baptist Homes have been able to receive some few persons, on a limited basis only, directly as patients. The majority of the beds in the Nursing Care Unit are used for the residents of the five Homes, when nursing care becomes necessary. We are glad that the base of our operation had been broadened to include a ministry to the aging sick person, and we can hope that we will move forward and be able to receive more patients in the years ahead.

Ministry to an older person is a direct ministry to Christ and is one of the finest things that North Carolina Baptists are doing. Be glad that you are a Baptist, and be grateful for the part that you are having in making the life of an aging person more abundant and more secure.

#### White Plains Baptist Church

Before White Plains Church was established the nearest Baptist churches were: Taylorsville First, Sulphur Springs, Macedonia, and Mt. Nebo. Because of the distance many in the community were not attending services anywhere.

Mrs. Emma Adams became concerned about her boys and others in the community and was afraid that they were going to be lost. Mrs. Adams met Mr. C. F. Friday in the road one Sunday Morning as he was on his way to Mt. Nebo Church and discussed the matter which was on her heart. They decided to try to organize a Sunday School and Mr. Friday agreed to conduct the service.

Mrs. Emma Adams, her boys and Mrs. Arthur Adams along with Mrs. Fate Campbell and her son, John, and Mrs. W. C. Kerley began raking, cutting sprouts, and cleaning the grounds to make ready for the service. Seating space was provided by logs and rough plank seats placed between the trees in the grove. The grove was the property of T. F. Adams (father-in-law of Mrs. Emma Adams whose husband was Fielding Adams) and was later deeded to the church. (Deed dated August, 1912) Sunday School was first held in June, 1912.

The first revival was held in the grove on the third Sunday in September, 1912. It was conducted by Elders D. W. Poole, Vasti, N.C.; J. W. Watts, Liledown, N.C.; and L.P. Gwaltney, Hiddenite, N.C. In this revival there were 39 conversions, 20 being baptized.

White Plains Baptist Church was organized on Saturday, November 9, 1912 in the grove. A presbytery composed of Elders L.P. Gwaltney, D.W. Poole, and J.W. Watts, and Deacons J.E. Chatham, J.W. Pharr, and B.F. Patterson met and organized by electing Elder J.W. Watts Chairman, who in turn called J.L. Teague to act as clerk. Thirty-four people came forward, bearing letters, as follows: W. C. Kerley(ordained deacon), Stella Mayberry, C. C. Mayberry, Maudie Mayberry, A. C. Mayberry, Katie Mayberry, Pinkey Mayberry, Ralph Mayberry, Romulus Mayberry, M.E. Mayberry, Minnie Mayberry, C. F. Friday, Kelaey H. Campbell, J.L. Compbell, James C. Compbell, Fielding Adams, H. A. Pressley, M.J. Icenhour, A. V. Brown, A. M. Brown, Mary Kerley, I. M. Atwood, M. E. Little, J. E. Kerley, Hessie Friday, M. J. Childers, Florence Campbell Lackey, Emma Adams, Ella Little, Jane Mullis, Jay Robinette, H, C. Childers, and J. B. Blankenship. The following twenty who were baptized after the first revival also came forward: Mavis Blankenship, Levitis Blankenship, Jettie Little, Trivie Childers, Florence Pressley, Nina Smith, Dottie Smith, Emma Burgess, Ola Sloope, Della Sloope, George Smith, Maurice Childers, John B. Sloope, James Hines, Ernest Hines, Arthur Adams, Ina Adams, Robert Adams, Walter Adams, Mamie Adams, R. P. Pressley, and Partee Childers. Brother L. P. Gwaltney was appointed to examine the applicants. After a satisfactory examination

on the fundamental doctrines of the Bible, Brother L.P. Gwaltney then read a church covenant, to which all the members gave their vote of adoption by rising.

The covenant is as follows to wit:

Having been as we trust brought by devine grace to embrace the Lord Jesus Christ, We do not solemnly covenant with each other to walk together in Him with brotherly love to His Glory, as our Common Lord. We do therefore in His strength engage:

1. That we will exercise a Christian Care and watch over each other for good.

II, That we will warn, admonish, and dexort each other to love

and good works.

III. That we will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together

but will uphold the worship and ordinances of God's house.

IV. We will maintain personal and family religion in our homes, striving to lead our children and those under our care to the service of Christ and the enjoyment of Heaven.

V. That we will seek devine aid, endeavoring to walk circumspectly

before the world that we may lead others to Christ.

VI. That we will cheerfully contribute of our means, as God may prosper us, for the poor, and to maintain the gospel at home and abroad.

VII. And may thee God of All Grace make us perfect to do His will working in us that which is well pleasing in His sight through Jesus Christ; to Whom be Glory forever and ever. Amen.

The following deacons were ordained: Fielding Adams, C. C. Mayberry, Jay Robinette, H. A. Pressley and J. D. Blankenship.

After organization of the church, services were held in Glade Creek School House by Rev. J.W. Watts from December 8, 1912 to April 12, 1913, when the first service was held in the First new church building.

The church progressed rapidly and in August, 1914, a revival was held by Rev. L. P. Gwaltney, G. Y. Bumgarner, D. W. Poole, and Elbert Payne, and J. W. Watts, pastor. The fifth Sunday in August, 1914, a baptizing was recorded with over 2,000 people present.

Rev. J. W. Watts served as pastor until January, 1918, and at that time Brother George Bumgarner was called and served until his death. Rev. E.V. Bumgarner filled the pulpit from March 8, 1919 until June 7, 1919. The church then called Rev. Elbert Payne, who served as pastor til September 20, 1924. Rev. A. W. Wilcox served from 1924 to September 8, 1928. Rev. J. W. Watts served again from 1928 until October 8, 1932. Rev. S. I. Watts served from that time until June 1944 and from July 1944 until October of that year, Rev. J. C. Gwaltney pastored. At that time Rev. Wade Rogers was called and he served until November 1946. Rev. R. C. Loyd served from December 1946 until December 1952. Rev. Mack McCurdy was then called as pastor from February, 1953 until June 1958, at

which time Rev. Arthur Jenkins became pastor, until April 24, 1966.
Rev. Charlie Poole became pastor, July 1966 until June 1967. Rev. James
Hartness became pastor October 29, 1967 and is still serving.

Ministers ordained since the organization of the church are as follows:

The origianl Church building was remodeled in 1945, adding Sunday School rooms. In September 1957, the church voted to build a completely new building. Plans were started and by the summer of 1958 the building was complete. On August 9, 1958 the first services were held with Rev. E. V. Bumgarner as guest minister.

Since the new church building was completed, there have been 11 deacons ordained who are:

#### CONSTITUTION

Name

#### ARTICLE I

This Union of Churches shall be known as the Rocky Face Baptist Association.

#### Purpose

#### ARTICLE II

The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men. It shall strive, as far as possit to aid in the development of the churches which constitute its membership. Each church shall be free to support such mission work as it feels led; however, every church is urged to comply with the teaching of the scriptures concerning missions.

#### Membership

#### ARTICLE III

The membership of this Association shall be comprised of Missionary Baptist Churches and sponsored missions.

Churches or missions desiring affiliation with this Association, upon proper notice to the Association Executive Committee, shall be taken under the watchcare of the Association one year; thence into membership.

All affiliated churches and missions shall be expected tooperate in all associational programs of work.

Each church or mission may be represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association by at least three (3) messengers elected by the church from its active membership. Messengers shall be limited to a basis of 1-50 members after the basic three messengers (basic three messengers to equal the first 150 membership).

#### Affiliation |

#### TICLE IV

This Association shall be affiliated with the North rolina Baptist State Convention and in turn with the athern Baptist Convention.

#### Meeting

#### TICLE V

This Association shall hold an annual meeting the last inesday and Thursday in October of each year, the Thursday ssion to be a night session. Quarterly conferences shall be ld in the first Sunday afternoon of each quarter. The ecutive Committee may call other meetings if deemed necessary.

#### Officers

#### FICLE VI

The officers of the Association shall be:

(1) A Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk Treasurer, storian, Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible nool Superintendent, Training Union Directory, and W. M. U. esident.

(2) The above officers are to be elected on the first day the Annual Session and shall take charge at the close of the ssion. Officers may be re-elected to successive terms if reeable with both Association and officers.

(3) All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating

mmittee.

- (4) An Executive Committee shall be constituted of the lowing:
  - The pastor of each church or mission affiliated with the Association.
  - b. One Laymen elected by each church from its active membership.
  - Any other General Associational officer not herein under covered.
  - d. The committee shall elect chairman from its own group.

#### Powers

#### ARTICLE VII

The powers of this body shall be kept in strick conformity with New Testament principles.

(1) The Association cannot obligate or bind any church

in any matter.

(2) The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise loardship over God's heritage.

(3) It shall act only as an advisory council in all

matters. Then only when called upon by the churches.

(4) Any church of the Association may appeal to the

Association through the Executive Committee for advice.

(5) The Associaton shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until charges are brought against it by some other church and carefully considered by the Executive Committee of the Association.

(6) The officers of the Association shall be expected to promote within the Association the duties of their office. It shall be their responsibility to contact, encourage and promote

the work among the churches.

(7) The Association shall have no power over the Ordinatin of Ministers or the organization of new churches, unless help 1

requested by interested parties.

(8) All matters to be considered at the Annual Session shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to Annual Session.

(9) All decisions shall be reached by majority vote of

messengers present at the session.

(10) Each messenger to exercise his voting priviledge mus register with the clerk and wear his registration tag. An alternate voting in the place of a messenger must do likewise.

#### Committees

#### ARTICLE VIII

The Nominating Committee shall at the beginning of each Annual Session prsent to the body a slate of the following committees and or officers.

(1) A slate of General Officers listed herein under.

(2) Program Committee-Annual Session-5 members (Vice Moderator, Clerk, one Pastor and two Layment).

(3) Time, Place, Preacher - 3 members (any church wishing invite the Association for the next Annual Session, shall do by filing a written invitation with the clerk one month fore the immediate session).

(4) A new Committee on Nominations - 5 members.

5) Resolutions - 3 members.

(6) The report of the Nomination Committee shall be inted in sufficient number for distribution at the Annual ssion. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations contact each person that is placed before the body for ections, to secure their assent.

#### BY-LAWS

#### TICLE I

All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer.

#### TICLE II

The enrolled messengers present will constitute a quorum transact business in the name of the Association.

#### Duties of Officers

#### TICLE III

(1) Moderator - preside at the meeting, preserve order, point any committees as deemed necessary and exercise all her duties of a presiding officer.

all be the basis of ruling order.

He shall, so far as his private duties permit, mmunicate with the churches promoting the work of the ngdom.

- (2) Vice Moderator preside in the absence or at the vitation of the Moderator. Perform all other duties common moderator at this instruction.
- (3) Clerk keep an accurate record of the proceedings the body and superintend the printing and distribution of a same. One month following the Annual Association Meeting clerk shall forward to the printer all material then in his

possession for the printing of the minutes. The minutes are to be printed whether or not all church letters have been received at that time.

He shall be paid \$50.00 annually for his services.

(4) Treasurer - it shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and distribute all funds connected with the work of the Association as directed by the body, and to make an annual statement of the same.

All money paid into the Association treasury shall be

acceptable by check only.

The treasurer shall be paid \$1.25 per hour for the number of hours actually spent discharging the work for the Association.

The treasurer shall act as the secretary for the Association.

- (5) Historian it shall be the duty of the Historian to prepare for publication in the minutes a historical sketch of the church with whom the day session is held.
- (6) Sunday School Superintendent, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W. M. U. Presiden it shall be their duty to promote their respective work amounthe churches and at the associational level.

#### Duties of Committees

#### ARTICLE IV

(1) Program: (Annual Session) It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare and publish at least 60 days prior to Annual Session the program agenda. A verbal commitmet must be received from all participates on the program. In evet a speaker cannot fill his commitment, it shall be his responsibility to notify the committee, in advance of the session, excet in extreme emergencies.

(Quarterly Conference) - To prepare an appropriate, informative and inspirational program. The committee shall us

its own discretion as to program material.

(2) Time, Place, and Preacher - It shall be the duty of the committee to select the place of the next Annual Session, to fix the time, name of the preacher and alternate to preach the Annual Sermon. (See No. 3, Article VIII of Constitution)

(3) Nominations - It shall be the duty of the Committee nominations to nominate the officers of the association as we

It shall be the responsibility of the clerk to insert at proper place in the printed minutes any new motion concerning titution, By-Laws or Policy that may be adopted.

#### CLE VIII

The Constitution and By-Laws may be changed or ammended or sed at any regular session if a majority of the messengers ur, provided the notice under Article VII of the Constitution been given.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

In May of this year Baptist Hospital observed its 50th Anniversary. The hospital opened its doors in May of 1923 "to bring the healing art more definitely under the dominion of the Great Healer."

The anniversary was celebrated jointly with the dedication of the new Reynolds Tower, a 16-story patient care facility. The completion of the Tower brings the total bed capacity to 655, placing Baptist Hospital within the top 10 per cent (in size) among hospitals in the United States. When the renovatio of older sections of the hospital is completed the total number of beds will be 717.

Construction has begun on an ambulatory care building whic will house the emergency room, several outpatient clinics, the Physical Therapy Department, and an Oncology (Cancer) Clinic and Research Laboratories. This building and the above-mention renovation will complete the prsent Medical Center Development Program.

Last November the Baptist State Convention heard the report of the Committee of 15 and adopted its recommendations. The hospital has been seeking to implement these recommendations:

- 1. A Medical Center Committee, composed of 8
  Trustees from the Baptist Hospital Board
  and 8 from the Wake Forest University Board,
  has been appointed. This committee will
  consider matters involving the Medical Center
  and its future operation.
- 2. In January the hospital trustees appointed a committee of three to review appropriations from the Mother's Day fund and assist hospital personnel in making decisions on some specific requests for assistance. The hospital continues to provide care for people who cannot pay, valued at far in excess of the total Mother's Day Offering. The auditors' confirmed value of this care in 1972 was \$1,390,000-nearly four times the amount of the Mother's Day Offering-and this does not include the value of physicians' service, provided without cost to these service patients.

3. The Department of Pastoral Care is expanding its services to provide training for lay people. Dr. Mahan Siler joined the staff June 1 to head up this new work. The Department also anticipates the establishment of several sattlelite counseling and training centers in the state, beginning in the near future. Your Cooperative Program gifts support the work of this department.

The hospital's financial operation is "in the black", and there has not been a general room rate increase in 2-1/2 years. Is of this date, the Mother's Day Offerings are running ahead of last year.

#### HISTORY OF BETHEL BAPTIST CHURCH

Bethel Baptist Church is located in Alexander County tens north of Taylorsville. Bethel was organized around the 1800. The records are lost from the organization up to year of 1827. We find, however, that Bethel Church was esented in the Brier Creek Association in 1822.

The first place of worship was in a brush arbor about two swest of the present site. A log building was erected he present site, around the year 1800.

We have no record when the second building was erected, it was remodeled in the year 1871. A brick church builwas built in 1947. In the early days of the church before A. M. Dodson was pastor, also E. M. Griffin. W. M. Beck das clerk and pastor from 1827 to 1836. Also S. P. Smith 1838 to 1841.

#### HITE PLAINS:

#### CONSTITUTION

#### Name

#### ARTICLE I

This Union of Churches shall be known as the Rocky Face Baptist Association.

#### Purpose

#### ARTICLE II

The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men. It shall strive, as far as possible to aid in the development of the churches which constitute its membership. Each church shall be free to support such mission work as it feels led; however, every church is urged to comply with the teaching of the scriptures concerning missions.

#### Membership

#### ARTICLE III

The membership of this Association shall be comprised of Missionary Baptist Churches and sponsored missions.

Churches or missions desiring affiliation with this Association, upon proper notice to the Association Executive Committee, shall be taken under the watchcare of the Association for one year; thence into membership.

All affiliated churches and missions shall be expected to cooperate in all associational programs of work.

Each church or mission may be represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association by at least three (3) messengers elected by the church from its active membership. Messengers shall be limited to a basis of 1-50 members after the basic three messengers (basic three messengers to equal the first 150 membership)

#### <u>Affiliation</u>

#### ARTICLE IV

This Association shall be affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and in turn with the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### Meeting

#### ARTICLE V

This Association shall hold an annual meeting the last Wednesday and Thursday in October of each year, the Thursday session to be a night session. Quarterly conferences shall be held in the first Sunday afternoon of each quarter. The Executive Committee may call other meetings if deemed necessary.

#### Officers

#### ARTICLE VI

The officers of the Association shall be:

(1) A Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W.M.U. President.

(2) The above officers are to be elected on the first day of the Annual Session and shall take charge at the close of the Session. Officers may be re-elected to successive terms if agreeable with both Association and officers.

(3) All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee.

(4) An Executive Committee shall be consti-

tuted of the following:

- a. The pastor of each church or mission affiliated with the Association.
- b. One layman elected by each church from its active membership.
- c. Any other General Associational officer not herein under covered.
- d. The committee shall elect chairman from its own group.

#### Powers

#### ARTICLE VII

The powers of this body shall be kept in strict conformity with New Testament principles.

(1) The Association cannot obligate or

bind any church in any matter.

(2) The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise lordship over God's heritage.

(3) It shall act only as an advisory council in all matters. Then only when called upon by the churches.

(4) Any church of the Association may appeal to the Association through the Executive

Committee for advice.

- (5) The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until charges are brought against it by some other church and carefully considered by the Executive Committee of the Association.
- (6) The officers of the Association shall be expected to promote within the Association the duties of their office. It shall be their responsibility to contact, encourage and promote the work among the churches.

(7) The Association shall have no power over the Ordination of Ministers or the organization of new churches, unless help is requested by interested parties.

(8) All matters to be considered at the Annual Session shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to the

Annual Session.

(9) All decisions shall be reached by majority vote of messengers present at the

session.

(10) Each messenger to exercise his voting priviledge must register with the clerk and wear his registration tag. An alternate voting in the place of a messenger must do likewise.

#### Committees

#### ARTICLE VIII

The Nominating Committee shall at the beginning of each Annual Session present to the body a slate of the following committees and/or officers.

(1) A slate of General Officers listed herein under.

(2) Program Committee-Annual Session-5 members (Vice Moderator, Clerk, one Pastor and

two Laymen).

- (3) Time, Place, Preacher 3 members (any church wishing to invite the Association for the next Annual Session, shall do so by filing a written invitation with the clerk one month before the immediate session).
- (4) A new Committee on Nominations 5 members.
  - (5) Resolutions 3 members.
- (6) The report of the Nomination Committee shall be printed in sufficient number for distribution at the Annual Session. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to contact each person that is placed before the body for elections, to secure their assent.

#### BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE I

All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer.

#### ARTICLE II

The enrolled messengers present will constitute a quorum to transact business in the name of the Association.

#### Duties of Officers

#### ARTICLE III

(1) Moderator - preside at the meeting, preserve order, appoint any committees as deemed necessary and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer.

The book of Parliamentary Procedures by Keerfoot shall be the basis of ruling order.

He shall, so far as his private duties permit, communicate with the churches promoting the work of the Kingdom.

- (2) Vice Moderator preside in the absence or at the invitation of the Moderator. Perform all other duties common to moderator at this instruction.
- (3) Clerk keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distribution of the same. One month following the Annual Association Meeting the clerk shall forward to the printer all material then in his possession for the printing of the minutes. The minutes are to be printed whether or not all church letters have been received at that time.

He shall be paid \$50.00 annually for his services.

(4) Treasurer - it shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and distribute all funds connected with the work of the Association as directed by the body, and to make an annual statement of the same.

All money paid into the Association treas-

ury shall be acceptable by check only.

The treasurer shall be paid \$1.25 per hour for the number of hours actually spent discharging the work for the Association.

The treasurer shall act as the secretary of

the Association.

(5) Historian - it shall be the duty of the Historian to prepare for publication in the minutes a historical sketch of the church with whom the day session is held.

(6) Sunday School Superintendent, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W.M.U. President - it shall be their duty to promote their respective work among the churches and at the associational level.

#### Duties of Committees

#### ARTICLE IV

(1) Program: (Annual Session) It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare and publish at lease 60 days prior to Annual Session the program agenda. A verbal commitment must be received from all participants on the program. In event a speaker cannot fill his commitment, it shall be his responsibility to notify the committee, in advance of the session, except in extreme emergencies.

(Quarterly Conference) - To prepare an appropriate, informative and inspirational program. The committee shall use its own discretion as to program material.

(2) Time, Place, and Preacher - It shall be the duty of the committee to select the place of the next Annual Session, to fix the time, name of the preacher and alternate to

preach the Annual Sermon. (See No. 3, Article VIII of Constitution).

(3) Nominations - It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to nominate the officers of the association as well as standing committee members. This committee shall report to the Executive Committee at least 60 days prior to the Annual Session.

(4) Resolutions - It shall be the duty of the Committee on Resolutions to prepare and purpose to the Association resolutions of appreciation to the host church and consider

appreciation to the host church, and consider any other matters referred to it by the

moderator.

#### ARTICLE V

The expenses of the Association shall be provided for by the churches. Each church in the Association shall be expected to share in this provision of funds.

All money coming into the Association shall

be directed to the treasurer.

For the sake of clarity the clerk shall advise each church at least 30 days prior to the Annual Session concerning the cost per copy of Associational Minutes.

#### ARTICLE VI

Any motion for Associational or Executive Committee consideration must be presented in writing, at the time it is presented verbally, for consideration by the body or committee.

#### ARTICLE VII

It shall be the responsibility of the clerk to insert at the proper place in the printed minutes any new motion concerning constitution, By-laws or Policy that may be adopted.

#### ARTICLE VIII

The Constitution and By-Laws may be changed or ammended or revised at any regular session if a majority of the messengers concur, provided the notice under Article VII of the Constitution has been given.

As a Baptist, among the many vital ministries that you support are your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging. For over 23 years now, you have had a part in serving hundreds of older people and making life much happier and secure for them. You have done so through two very helpful means of income: (1) The Special Offering for the Homes, received on the 3rd Sunday of February each year; (2) The Cooperative Program. Gifts through these two sources have increased from year to year, and offerings for 1974 will perhaps exceed \$350,000, providing more than 30% of the budget needed to operate 5 resident Homes and Nursing Care Unit.

God, through you, has blessed this ministry of our Baptist Homes in a remarkable way, leading you to establish two Homes in Winston-Salem, Resthaven, and the Hayes Home, and the Nursing Care Unit, and three other Homes at Albemarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville. In these Homes, 4 out of every 5 residents depend upon your love gifts and simply could not be cared for without your help.

Of greatest significance during the past year, has been the decision by the Trustees of the Homes to establish a 6th Home in Western North Carolina, to be located in the city of Asheville on the Pearson Estate, a magnificently beautiful twenty-one acre site, overlooking the city, and with the gorgeous Blue Ridge Mountains in the background. A dedicated group of people in the Western Carolina area have organized the first initial phase of what will become, it is hoped, a major State-Wide fund-raising effort to obtain the necessary money to build this

proposed Home, after approval by the General Board, and the Baptist State Convention. Chruch groups are encouraged to visit the beautiful site on which the proposed Home will be built, and will be served lunch, if an appointment is made in advance.

With the addition of a 6th Home for the Aging, with the spiraling cost of living, and the great and ever-increasing needs of older people, it is most urgent that our Baptist people be more generous than ever before in support for the Homes through the regular channels of the 3rd Sunday of February Offering, the Cooperative Program, and an over and above gift for the Western North Carolina Home.

Ministry to an older person is a direct ministry as unto Christ Himself and is most leasing to Him, we are sure!

Let's not just study about salvation, let's share with one another our experiences with Jesus Christ.

In 1974, 15 churches our of 15, reported an enrollment of 1,412 with an average attendance of 1,127.

#### 1974 BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT

The BIBLICAL RECORDER is grateful for another good year, although these are difficult days for religious publications. Some have had to go out of business while others are squeezed by rising costs. The RECORDER has not escaped the pressures of inflation. For example, paper has risen 61 per cent already this year—and the end is not in sight.

Even so, the RECORDER has been in business for 141 years and expects to continue. A few changes have to be made, however, to keep the paper strong. As staff members have resigned or retired they have not been replaced. Some weeks the number of pages has to be reduced to save money, but readers have been very understanding.

Despite some problems, the RECORDER is enjoying its highest circulation in history—more than 111,000—thanks to the continuing support of the vast majority of Baptist churches in the state. These churches and their members remember the part the RECORDER played in the overwhelming defeat of liquor by the drink last November. This is probably the most significant story that the RECORDER has reported since the associations met last year. You will remember that approximately 70 per cent of the voters in the state voted against liquor by the drink and it was defeated in 97 of 100 counties. This should take care of this issue for awhile.

The RECORDER will continue its emphasis on local church coverage, seeking to deal with problems that every church has. Naturally, we are prejudiced, but we do not believe any publication can take the place of the BIBLICAL

RECORDER. If your church does not send it to every family, may we ask a simple question: Why? At a cost of only a nickel a week for each family, this is the best investment a Baptist Church can make. Put the RECORDER in the budget before it has to increase the rate because of inflation.

#### HISTORY OF SULPHUR SPRINGS BAPTIST CHURCH

Sulphur Springs Baptist Church had its beginning on the porch of the James L. Davis residence across from the old cemetery. Rev. R.L. Steele, father-in-law of Davis preached to the group by monthly appointment.

It was decided to build a brush arbor below the upper spring near Davis Mill. Under the arbor, Rev. Steele and Rev. W.A. Poole held a revival meeting which culminated in the organization of the church on the third Saturday in October of 1867.

The first church was a small log structure. In 1885 it was decided to build a new church being completed in 1886. Five Sunday School rooms were added to the front in 1935. The roof had previously been repaired from two fires.

In the early 40's, more rooms were built at the rear. In 1953, the entire church was turned around, moved back about the length of the building, and all was encased in brick. Two wings with 16 new rooms and two rest rooms were included in this project.

Later a heating system was installed and the water system improved. In 1961 members decided to build a parsonage which was completed and a note burning held on Nov. 22, 1964.

Sometime later the sanctuary was lengthened, a baptistry added, and a choir loft put behind the pulpit. Carpet was installed and furnishings refinished or replaced. A new educational building was built with assembly room, nursery, Sunday School rooms and storage space.

Ordained ministers going out from the church include Charles Cook and Henry Cook.

The church has 234 members. Stuart White is pastor. Present active deacons are Edd Walker, Virgil High, Jack Hendren, Roy Durmire, Glenn Keever, Ray Bowles and Lynn Cook.

#### WHITE PLAINS:

#### CONSTITUTION

#### Name

#### ARTICLE I

This Union of Churches shall be known as the Rocky Face Baptist Association.

#### Purpose

#### ARTICLE II

The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men. It shall strive, as far as possible to aid in the development of the churches which constitute its membership. Each church shall be free to support such mission work as it feels led; however, every church is urged to comply with the teaching of the scriptures concerning missions.

#### Membership

#### ARTICLE III

The membership of this Association shall be comprised of Missionary Baptist Churches and sponsored missions.

Churches or missions desiring affiliation with this Association, upon proper notice to the Association Executive Committee, shall be taken under the watchcare of the Association for one year; thence into membership.

All affiliated churches and missions shall be expected to cooperate in all associational programs of work.

Each church or mission may be represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association by at least three (3) messengers elected by the church from its active membership. Messengers shall be limited to a basis of 1-50 members after the basic three messengers (basic three messengers to equal the first 150 membership)

#### <u>Affiliation</u>

#### ARTICLE IV

This Association shall be affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and in turn with the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### Meeting

#### ARTICLE V

This Association shall hold an annual meeting the last Wednesday and Thursday in October of each year, the Thursday session to be a night session. Quarterly conferences shall be held in the first Sunday afternoon of each quarter. The Executive Committee may call other meetings if deemed necessary.

#### Officers

#### ARTICLE VI

The officers of the Association shall be:

(1) A Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Superintendent of Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W.M.U. President.

(2) The above officers are to be elected on the first day of the Annual Session and shall take charge at the close of the Session. Officers may be re-elected to successive terms if agreeable with both Association and officers.

(3) All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee.

(4) An Executive Committee shall be consti-

tuted of the following:

- a. The pastor of each church or mission affiliated with the Association.
- b. One layman elected by each church from its active membership.
- c. Any other General Associational officer not herein under covered.
- d. The committee shall elect chairman from its own group.

#### Powers

#### ARTICLE VII

The powers of this body shall be kept in strict conformity with New Testament principles.

(1) The Association cannot obligate or

bind any church in any matter.

(2) The Association shall have no coercive power to exercise lordship over God's heritage.

(3) It shall act only as an advisory council in all matters. Then only when called upon by the churches.

(4) Any church of the Association may appeal to the Association through the Executive

Committee for advice.

- (5) The Association shall withdraw fellow-ship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until charges are brought against it by some other church and carefully considered by the Executive Committee of the Association.
- (6) The officers of the Association shall be expected to promote within the Association the duties of their office. It shall be their responsibility to contact, encourage and promote the work among the churches.

(7) The Association shall have no power over the Ordination of Ministers or the organization of new churches, unless help is requested by interested parties.

(8) All matters to be considered at the Annual Session shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least 90 days prior to the

Annual Session.

(9) All decisions shall be reached by majority vote of messengers present at the

session.

(10) Each messenger to exercise his voting priviledge must register with the clerk and wear his registration tag. An alternate voting in the place of a messenger must do likewise.

#### Committees

#### ARTICLE VIII

The Nominating Committee shall at the beginning of each Annual Session present to the body a slate of the following committees and/or officers.

(1) A slate of General Officers listed herein under.

(2) Program Committee-Annual Session-5 members (Vice Moderator, Clerk, one Pastor and

two Laymen).

- (3) Time, Place, Preacher 3 members (any church wishing to invite the Association for the next Annual Session, shall do so by filing a written invitation with the clerk one month before the immediate session).
- (4) A new Committee on Nominations 5 members.
  - (5) Resolutions 3 members.
- (6) The report of the Nomination Committee shall be printed in sufficient number for distribution at the Annual Session. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to contact each person that is placed before the body for elections, to secure their assent.

#### BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE I

All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer.

#### ARTICLE II

The enrolled messengers present will constitute a quorum to transact business in the name of the Association.

#### Duties of Officers

#### ARTICLE III

(1) Moderator - preside at the meeting, preserve order, appoint any committees as deemed necessary and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer.

The book of Parliamentary Procedures by Keerfoot shall be the basis of ruling order.

He shall, so far as his private duties permit, communicate with the churches promoting the work of the Kingdom.

- (2) Vice Moderator preside in the absence or at the invitation of the Moderator. Perform all other duties common to moderator at this instruction.
- (3) Clerk keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distribution of the same. One month following the Annual Association Meeting the clerk shall forward to the printer all material then in his possession for the printing of the minutes. The minutes are to be printed whether or not all church letters have been received at that time.

He shall be paid \$50.00 annually for his services.

(4) Treasurer - it shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and distribute all funds connected with the work of the Association as directed by the body, and to make an annual statement of the same.

All money paid into the Association treas-

ury shall be acceptable by check only.

The treasurer shall be paid \$1.25 per hour for the number of hours actually spent discharging the work for the Association.

The treasurer shall act as the secretary of

the Association.

(5) Historian - it shall be the duty of the Historian to prepare for publication in the minutes a historical sketch of the church with whom the day session is held.

(6) Sunday School Superintendent, Vacation Bible School Superintendent, Training Union Director, and W.M.U. President - it shall be their duty to promote their respective work among the churches and at the associational level,

#### Duties of Committees

#### ARTICLE IV

(1) Program: (Annual Session) It shall be the duty of the Program Committee to prepare and publish at lease 60 days prior to Annual Session the program agenda. A verbal commitment must be received from all participants on the program. In event a speaker cannot fill his commitment, it shall be his responsibility to notify the committee, in advance of the session, except in extreme emergencies.

(Quarterly Conference) - To prepare an appropriate, informative and inspirational program. The committee shall use its own discretion as to program material.

(2) Time, Place, and Preacher - It shall be the duty of the committee to select the place of the next Annual Session, to fix the time, name of the preacher and alternate to

preach the Annual Sermon. (See No. 3, Article VIII of Constitution).

(3) Nominations - It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to nominate the officers of the association as well as standing committee members. This committee shall report to the Executive Committee at least 60 days prior to the Annual Session.

(4) Resolutions - It shall be the duty of the Committee on Resolutions to prepare and purpose to the Association resolutions of appreciation to the host church, and consider any other matters referred to it by the

moderator.

#### ARTICLE V

The expenses of the Association shall be provided for by the churches. Each church in the Association shall be expected to share in this provision of funds.

All money coming into the Association shall

be directed to the treasurer.

For the sake of clarity the clerk shall advise each church at least 30 days prior to the Annual Session concerning the cost per copy of Associational Minutes.

#### ARTICLE VI

Any motion for Associational or Executive Committee consideration must be presented in writing, at the time it is presented verbally, for consideration by the body or committee.

#### ARTICLE VII

It shall be the responsibility of the clerk to insert at the proper place in the printed minutes any new motion concerning constitution, By-laws or Policy that may be adopted.

# ARTICLE VIII

The Constitution and By-Laws may be changed or ammended or revised at any regular session if a majority of the messengers concur, provided the notice under Article VII of the Constitution has been given.

N. C. Baptist Homes for the Aging

There has never been a year in the history of your Baptist Homes when more people have sought the services of the Homes. This has been true particularly of the aging sick person. Almost daily calls come from older persons, and their families, inquiring about admission to one of your five resident Homes and the Skilled Nursing Care Facility of the Homes.

Today there are some 21,000,000 Americans, 65 and above, and this number, it is anticipated, will grow by over 300,000 a year in the years ahead. The needs of aging people are overwhelming, and we must strive diligently to meet those needs.

Although we can minister in our North Carolina Baptist Homes to only 230 persons at any given time, we have served hundreds of aging people through the 24 years that we have been on the scene at Resthave, the Hayes Home, and the Nursing Care Unit, in Winston-Salem, Albemarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville. As God continues to bless us and lead us, we will make every effort to expand our ministry and to reach out and help as many older persons as possible in the years ahead. We can do this only by the grace of the Lord and by the increased concern and giving of our Baptist people.

Gifts for 1974-75 from our Baptist Churches reflect a very encouraging increase. This is great, and we are grateful especially since 4 out of every 5 persons who live in our Homes depend upon these love gifts for their care! Your love gift is a life-line to these deserving older persons, and they could not be cared for if it were not for you.

Signs on the horizon indicate that we will need greater financial support for our Homes for the Aging from our Baptist people than ever before.

The most exciting development in the family of your Baptist Homes for the past year has been the experience of obtaining one of the most beautiful locations in the Blue Ridge Mountains of N.C. for the proposed Western N. C. Baptist Home. This site is a 21 acre tract of land overlooking the city of Asheville. God Himself, we feel, has guided us in discovering this beautiful site.

Plans are in the making now to raise \$1,000, 000 for the construction of this new proposed Western N.C. Baptist Home. These plans initially will include 50 rooms for residents, with living room, dining room, library, chapel and activities room, and other necessary rooms. With the completion of this Home, N.C. Baptists will be enlarging their base of ministry to almost 300 persons, and older people from Western N.C. will have a facility to serve the hundreds in their area who will need the service of this lovely facility now and in the years to come.

Pray for the ministry of your Baptist Homes for the Aging. Give as liberally as possible that the overwhelming needs of older people in our midst might be met more adequately. Visit the Homes and see first-hand the personal joy that your gifts bring. Know that your ministry to even one of these dear older people is a ministry as unto Christ Himself.



## HISTORY OF FRIENDLY CHAPEL BAPTIST CHURCH

Mr. John Fox and Paul Levan were deeply disturbed about so many unchurched and underprivileged people in North Iredell County.

So in the summer of 1961 they rented a sheet metal building with a dirt floor and a tin heat Services were held each Sunday with some 12-15 people attending. They named it Friendly Chape Jimmy Hayes, Dwight Shoemaker, and Paul Levan were appointed trustees.

Two months after starting the mission, the owner decided to sell the property, so we bought it, paying \$50 per month. Friendly Chape then owned one acre land and a metal building with a "path" off the Chipney Ford Road.

In 1962 Pleasant Grove Baptist Church took us 'under their wing' and gave us help with our Vacation Bible School plus other guidance. They offered to underwrite our debts if we would deed our property over to them. We decided then we would be responsible for our own debts and at the present time have none.

The congregation grew slowly but steadily. After about 5 years, we tried to buy some land nearby to build a church but could not. So we traded the property on the Chipney Ford Road for three acres on Highway 115, our present site

Pleasant Grove helped alot with our building program and planning the educational building. People from both churches volunteered their help seeing the church completed. This was a time of close communication and fellowship with our mother church. Through the years we continue to improve and update our church building, with plans to build a sanctuary in the near future.

Only one body rests in the cemetery, that of Frank Carrico, a young boy killed in an auto accident in 1969.

On May 21, 1967, Friendly Chapel was organized into a church. Paul Levan was called as pastor. There were 25 Charter members, including Paul Levan, Lula B. Levan, Dwight Shoemaker, Betty Shoemaker, Melt Shoemaker, Cleve Wilborne, Eddie F. Levan, Marie T. Levan, Lester Lambert, Jimmy Hayes, Maxine M. Hayes, Mary Wilcox, Betty Wilcox, Thomas Wilcox, Shirley Poole, Mrs. Nola Dishman, Margie W. Dishman, Dwaine Wilborn, Coley Johnson, Ester Johnson, Gwinn Johnson, Kenneth Johnson, Delia Johnson, Ronald Levan, and Betty C. Levan.

Pastors who have served the church are: Paul Levan, from 1961 to 1967; Rev. Clyde Holliman, Jr. from June, 1969 to November, 1970; Rev. Darrel Fox, from December 1970 to May of 1971; Rev. Homer Baity from May 1971 to the present time.

In August, 1974, Tommy McDaniels was licensed to preach the gospel. He was sent forth with prayers and best wishes.

Ordained deacons are Jerry Benfield, Tommy McDaniels, Dwaine Welborn, Junior Matthews, Ronald Levan, and Billy Baity.
