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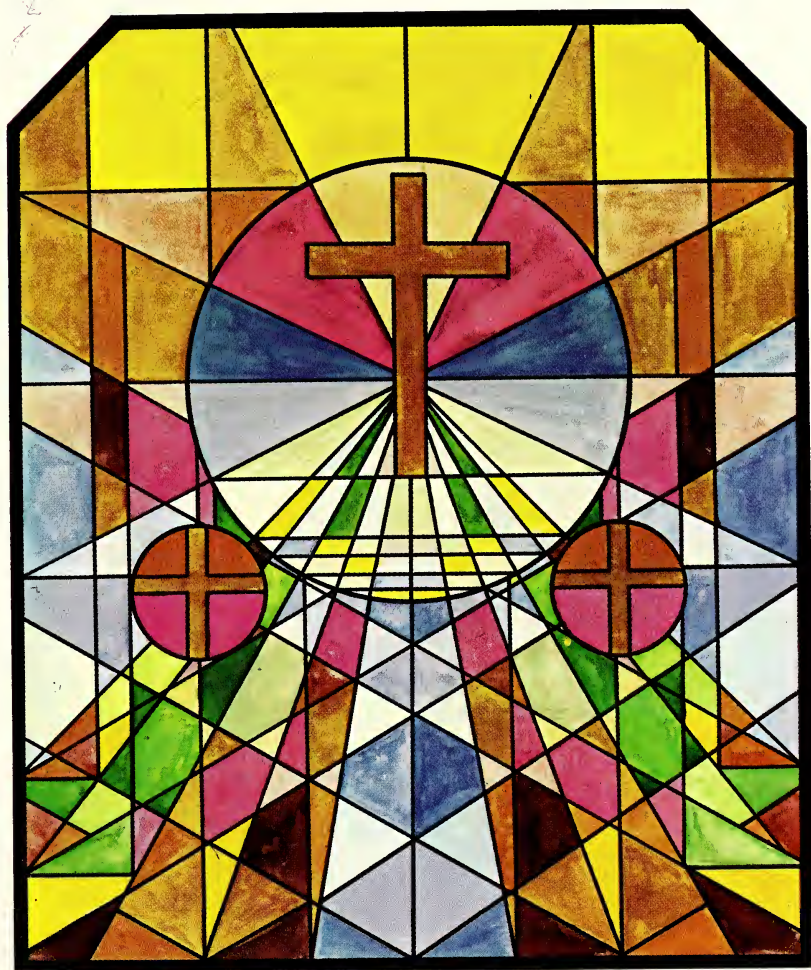

Constitution

ARTICLE I--NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II--PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the member churches, and to properly carry out these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the association, it shall be authorized and empowered to receive by purchase, gift or otherwise title to real or personal property and to sell, convey or mortgage same for the use and benefit of said association and its officers and agents, and shall elect three Trustees from its membership

who shall hold said title for said association, who shall serve for a term of three years or until their successors are elected and said trustees and their successors in office shall have the power and authority to sell, convey or mortgage any or all said property upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of said Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE III--MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet biannually in the Fall and Spring. The Fall session shall be primarily for business and the Spring session primarily for inspiration. The Annual Sermon shall be delivered during the Spring Session.

ARTICLE IV--RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, and approval by a credentials committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator shall give the Messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V--DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by letter and messenger and give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual report, these to be mailed at least six weeks before the annual session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the meeting of the Association .

ARTICLE VI--POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches, and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or letter at more than two consecutive

sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII--OFFICERS

The officers of the association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer (with the privilege of combining the office of Clerk and Treasurer), Auditor, Historian, Trustees, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Stewardship Chairman, Chairman of the Social Services Committee, and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee. The Moderator, the Vice-Moderator, the Clerk, the Historian, the Trustees, the Chairman of the Social Services Committee and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence at the conclusion of the session. The Treasurer and the Auditor shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence on January 1. The Sunday School Director, the Church Training Director, the Woman's Missionary Union Director, the Brotherhood Director, the Music Director, the Chairman of Evangelism and the Stewardship Chairman are to be elected in the spring meeting of the association and their terms of office shall commence upon election. The above officers shall be elected annually. At such time as the association shall elect a Superintendent of Missions, he becomes an officer of the association.

ARTICLE VIII--DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, to enforce the rules, to preserve order, and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also serve as ex-officio chairman of the Executive Committee of the Association. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, to serve as Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and to serve as Chairman of the Missions Committee.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the body, and use all diligence in having same printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible, to mail to the church clerks letter forms of the annual letters and to keep on hand the printed Minutes and other important documents belonging to the body. He shall also serve as ex-officio secretary of the Executive Committee.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse the moneys contributed for the expenses of the body as authorized by the Executive Body.

E. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and report to the Association annually.

F. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and to report at the annual session of the Association.

G. It shall be the duty of the Associational Missionary to respond, within the limits of his time and ability, to the

invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special Committees authorized by the Association.

H. It shall be the duty of the Associational Church Training Director to promote the interests of Church Training within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

I. It shall be the duty of the Associational Sunday School Director to promote the interests of the Sunday Schools within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

J. It shall be the duty of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union Superintendent to promote the interests of the Woman's Missionary Union within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished. This officer's election may be a confirmation of election by the Associational Woman's Missionary Union.

K. It shall be the duty of the Associational Brotherhood President to promote interests of the Brotherhood within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

L. The Associational Music Director shall plan and direct the music for all meetings of the Association and its Executive Committee and shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music in the churches of the Association.

M. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to hold title of all property of the Association, to act under the direction of the Association through its executive committee to execute necessary legal documents, and to supervise the maintenance of all property belonging to the Association. They shall also be responsible for and keep an undated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association. An additional copy of this inventory shall be filed with the Treasurer and at the Associational office.

N. It shall be the duty of the Associational Stewardship Chairman to both encourage and keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the stewardship of the total Christian life and witness. He shall make an annual progress report to the Association.

ARTICLE IX--EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Associational Officers as set forth in Article VII, Superintendent of Missions, Moderator for past year, and Pastor and two members from each participating Church. Each church shall elect two members to serve on the Executive Committee prior to the regular Fall Annual Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Superintendent of Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee and does not have the power to vote.

C. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

1. The Executive Committee of the Association is authorized to call a Superintendent of Missions, to determine his salary and to define his duties.

2. To Act for the Association between regular sessions of the body.
3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes
4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the Annual Budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Superintendent of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.
6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Committee in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

ARTICLE X--OTHER COMMITTEES

The following committees whose duties are prescribed below shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the yearly meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new committee will take office

A. Nominating Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to nominate the members of the various committees and Chairmen and associational officers deemed necessary to facilitate the work of the Association. The Nominating Committee will be appointed hereafter by the Moderator of the Association. This Committee shall retain at least two of it's members from the preceding year.

B. Credentials Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to provide the Association with Authority for operation to determine the extent of the powers of the Association and to examine Articles of Faith and recommend the admission of new churches to the Association. It is the duty of this Committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association by badges as voting members of the Association.

C. Resolutions Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to propose a budget to the Executive Committee and to suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. The committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. This Committee shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer shall serve as ex officio member of this committee .

E. Time, Place and Preacher Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational Meeting.

F. Missions Committee composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Chairman, Stewardship Chairman, and three (3) members at large, whose duty will be to assist the Superintendent of Missions in the planning, promoting, and execution of Associational programs making recommendations to the Executive Committee.

G. Program Committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association whose duty shall be to receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Missions Committee Chairman, Superintendent of Missions), draft and present the program, in printed form, for the sessions of the Association, which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become it's order of business. The host pastors shall be included in this Committee.

H. Constitution Committee shall be composed of five members whose duty shall be to make recommendations relative to Constitutional changes and serve as a parliamentary Committee for the Association. The Chairman shall serve in the advisory capacity of Parliamentarian to the Executive Committee and at the Annual Sessions of the Association.

I. Social Services Committee shall be composed of one representative each of the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Homes for Aging and Baptist Hospital whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of these institutions.

J. Christian Education Committee shall be composed of a Christian Literature Representative, a Christian Education Representative, and one member at large whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

ARTICLE XI--ORDAINING COUNCIL

In order to preserve the Baptist position with reference to the divine call to the ministry, and to recognize the responsibility of a local church to the entire Baptist denomination, the Association shall elect annually an ordaining council that may act in an advisory capacity for churches seeking its assistance. In setting up this Council and in its work, the following things are to be noted:

A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership.

B. That the church in which the candidate holds membership elect to the Council three members, one of them the pastor, provided he is not the candidate for ordination.

C. That the Tar River Association elect six members to constitute a standing ordaining council, to serve with the three members appointed by the local church, one of which shall be designated chairman by the Moderator. These shall serve terms of three years, and shall be ineligible to succeed themselves.

D. That the Council then proceed in the usual Baptist method and policy for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

E. That we encourage insofar as it is practical public ordination services.

F. That the Tar River Association furnish the minister thus set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry by this Council with credentials signed by the Moderator and Clerk of the Association and by each member of the Council.

ARTICLE XII--VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its

deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XIII--AMENDMENTS

This Constitution or the By-Laws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment(s) will be presented to afternoon session and voted on no earlier than evening session.

ARTICLE XIV--PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Roberts Rules of Order.

By-Laws

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. All resolutions must be stated in writing and handed to the Clerk.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.

10. Reports of Committees on Convention objects must be brief--that on Missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

13. The Clerk and Treasurer shall receive honorariums to be determined by the Executive Committee for their services as an expression of appreciation.

14. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, which histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

HISTORY OF EPHEBUS BAPTIST CHURCH

Ephesus Missionary Baptist Church was organized August 14, 1880 at Bryant School House which was situated on the same land where Ephesus Church building now stands.

Before this organization, Rev. George W. Coppedge had held

preaching services for a year or more under a bush-arbor here. The first minutes record that "according to previous appointment, Brother G. W. Coppedge and R. D. Harper met at the Bryant School House for the purpose of organizing a Missionary Baptist Church. James T. Webb was called to the chair and Willis M. Warren to act as clerk, when W. M. Warren and wife, Mahlia Warren, J. H. Valentine, H. M. Warren and wife, Anne Warren and Mary G. Fulford presented letters from Peachtree and S. J. Batchelor from Pleasant Grove. The Church thus organized with seven charter members, adopting the covenant and Articles of Faith as laid down in the Baptist Church Directory. W. M. Warren being a deacon, the church appointed J. H. Valentine a deacon. H. M. Warren was elected clerk and G. W. Coppedge called as Pastor."

On Monday, August 23, 1880, G. W. Coppedge in the chair, Victoria Lamm, Marzilla Lamm and Sarah Rackley were received for baptism.

In September, the second regular conference, the Church was named Ephesus. At the same meeting delegates were appointed to the Tar River Association and a minutes fund collected to be sent.

In October, H. M. Warren, S. J. Batchelor and R. T. Matthews were appointed Trustees and in December W. M. Warren was elected treasurer.

The church held worship services once a month on Saturday and Sunday, the business conference being on Saturday unless an important issue was held over for vote on Sunday.

Two acres of land was bought from Wiley Floyd for \$25.00 and in 1882 a church building was erected costing a little more than \$880.00 since the timber was given by James T. (Jim) Webb.

Willis Marion Warren bought the Bryant School House and one acre of land for \$20.00. He sold the school building which was moved to the Haywood Brantley Homeplace. He gave the acre of land to the church.

The minutes record that in September 1882 funds received were, Associational Missions \$100.00, Associational Minutes fund \$1.00 and State Missions \$3.00. The first Pastor's salary was \$60.00 per year.

In 1887 the church decided that the sisters be entitled to vote in electing pastors.

In 1888 a motion was made to move Ephesus Church to Spring Hope, decision was laid over until Sunday, decided for church to remain at same location.

By 1893 the church roll listed 133 members. This figure is from the revised roll. There has been a revision of the church roll four times, in 1893, 1919, 1930 and 1939. In the early years of the church discipline problems of the members were dealt with at almost every monthly conference. Statements made so often were, "excluded for heresy, withdrew fellowship for joining church of different faith and order, or for disorderly walk of being absent." Those excluded when ready to ask forgiveness were restored in full fellowship into the church.

In 1915 the church decided to have services twice a month.

In 1916 W. V. Denton was ordained for the Ministry. Others who have gone out from Ephesus Church as Ministers are Sanford L. Lamm, Albert S. Lamm, Hassell Lamm, David Edwards and Cecil C. Edwards. Two have been appointed as missionaries by the Home Mission Board, Albert S. Lamm and Douglas S. McLeroy.

In 1927 under the leadership of Rev. A. A. Pippin, a Baptist Young Peoples Union (B.Y.P.U.) was organized.

In 1929 the church was wired for electric lights.

In 1932, on August 19, a Homecoming and Children's Day combined was held.

In 1934 preparation for building the first Sunday School rooms was begun. Timber was donated and rooms completed in 1936.

In 1935 the first piano was bought.

In 1942 the church floors were repaired, interior furniture painted and carpet laid.

In 1945 a pump was bought for the well, chairs purchased for Primary and Beginner rooms.

In 1947 the first Bible School was held in June.

In 1948 Wednesday night prayer services were begun. Three acres of land which had been divided from the church grounds when Highway 581 was built was traded to Hobart Brantley for three acres adjoining the church property.

In 1950 gas heat was installed.

In 1953 became full-time church with resident pastor. The rotating system of deacons begun and first Wednesday night in each month set aside for business meeting. The fourth Sunday in September set as annual Homecoming Day. This has now been changed to the third Sunday. The church adopted a long-range three step building program, educational plant, pastorium, and sanctuary. The church building was moved a short distance to give space to build on the back of the church. Began use of bulletins in worship services.

In 1955 the educational building was completed. A Brotherhood was organized. There were 245 Sunday School members and 83 in Training Union.

In 1956 all indebtedness on the building was removed by the fall.

In 1957 the Baldwin Spinnet Organ was bought.

In 1958 the church purchased 60 feet of road frontage from Hobart Brantley for \$500.00 to have space to build pastorium.

In 1959 the pastorium was completed, costing \$16,545.86, plus timber valued at \$1,840.00 which was donated. Final payment was made in 1962.

In 1960 the Girls Auxiliary of the Woman's Missionary Union had its first coronation service with one queen, Judy Edwards.

On May 15, 1966 when without pastor, the church voted to discontinue Sunday night services.

In September 1967 the old sanctuary was torn down. The new building was begun.

On October 24, 1968, the sanctuary was completed at the cost of \$53,069.39. On November 24, the Girls Auxiliary held its second coronation Service. There were three queens, Nanette Warren, Debbie Lamm and Jeanie Proctor. Nanette Warren received the Queen With A Scepter Award.

In 1970 a Memorials Committee was established to be in charge of memorial gifts. They are Mrs. Willis R. Warren, Mrs. Levie Edwards, Charles Hathaway and J. Phillip Murray. A Library was established, the fund was started by Rev. Julius Lee in 1967.

On August 16, 1970 the last Coronation Service was held. Nanette Warren received the highest award offered by Woman's Missionary Union. "Queen Regent in Service," and later received added award "Service Aide Citation."

The church voted to publish Church Directory with pictures of church members and their family.

In 1970 the church membership is 221 and Sunday School

enrollment 138.

In 1973 a Study Committee was elected to find the needs of the church for a new building program.

In 1974 the N. C. State Highway Commission took part of church grounds for Highway Right of Way.

In July 1974 the church voted to add an approximately 32 x 48 building with kitchen facilities on to the present building and to renovate the present educational building. This building was dedicated March 30, 1975.

In 1975 the membership is 218.

The church has had twenty pastors, George W. Coppedge, M. J. Willoughby, R. P. Driver, R. D. Carrol, J. E. Hocutt, J. P. Gulley, J. W. Nobles, A. A. Pippin, J. N. Stancil, Ernest C. Upchurch, Harvey Coppedge, Jack Falls, Cline Borders, Hugh L. Borders, Daniel W. Smith, Kenneth L. Payton, Julius H. Lee, Don Lee Hunnings, Douglas S. McLeroy, and Ronald Arndt.

The church clerks have been Willis Marion Warren, Herbert P. Warren, Cecil Edwards, J. P. Murray, Mrs. Clara W. Strickland and present one, Mrs. Willis R. Warren. The clerks have seen that our church minutes and records have been kept and from these records come this history.

HISTORY OF PINE RIDGE BAPTIST CHURCH

On July 13, 1924, sixty-five members of the Pine Ridge Sunday School, which was begun in the late 1800's, met in the Pine Ridge School for the purpose of organizing a church. The Reverend J. W. Nobles, pastor of Poplar Springs Baptist Church of which a majority of the sixty-five present were members, served as moderator of the organizational meeting. The name, Pine Ridge Baptist Church, was agreed upon by those present. The Church Covenant and the Declaration of Faith were also adopted. B. S. Pace, J. F. Perry and T. E. Hinnant, Sr. were elected deacons. C. J. Tant was elected Church Clerk and with no further business the first meeting of Pine Ridge Baptist Church adjourned.

On July 26, 1924, at the close of the worship service, which was led by the Reverend Raleigh Sherron, the Church was called into conference and the Reverend J. A. McIvor was called as the first pastor of the Church. The time for preaching was set for the first Saturday and Sunday of the month. At this time the services were being held in the Pine Ridge School.

From December, 1925 until 1944 the following ministers served the church as pastors: the Reverend S. L. Lamm (2 years), the Reverend S. W. Lamb (1 year), the Reverend J. L. Coley (4 months), the Reverend E. G. Willis (1 year), the Reverend Charles B. Howard (1 year), the Reverend Guy Moore (6 years), the Reverend Carl Lewis (6 months), the Reverend Ralph Cannon (2 years).

These formative years proved to be fruitful years. The church began to grow and make steps forward. In 1931 the Baptist Young People's Union was organized. There was a growing interest to purchase the building in which the church was meeting. On December 3, 1940 the brick school building and the grounds surrounding were purchased for the sum of \$500.00. Following the purchase there was a great deal of remodeling work to be done.

In January of 1944, the Reverend M. A. Pegram was called as

pastor A budget of \$1,765.00 was adopted in 1945 It was set up as follows: Pastor's salary \$600.00, other salaries \$25.00, incidentals \$50.00, other objects \$100.00, Cooperative Program \$100.00, orphanage \$100.00 and \$730.00 to complete the building. In 1946 the Church agreed to pay \$60.00 per year toward the salary of an associational missionary. In June of 1954, the Church voted to build a Nursery. In October of 1954, the resignation of Reverend Pegram was regretfully accepted. Reverend Pegram had served the church faithfully for nearly eleven years, the longest period of service of any of its pastors. Under his leadership the Church was very progressive in its vision of its role as a servant of God.

On November 21, 1954, the Church voted upon recommendation of the deacons to build a parsonage and to form a field with the Poplar Springs Baptist Church. This would put Pine Ridge in a two-church field rather than a three-church field

On January 30, 1955, Pine Ridge called it's first student pastor, Rev. W. R. Lolley. He was serving, at the time, as the supply pastor of the church. Rev. Lolley served the church until 1958. During that time the pastorium was completed. Rev. Lolley was the first of a number of students that have served the church throughout the years. Other pastors serving the church are as follows: Rev. Earl Hardin (1 year), Rev. James Sides (4 years), Rev. Gerald Bagwell (2½ years), Rev. Ellis Fulbright (2½ years), Rev. Marion Patten (3 years) and Rev. Charles White has served as pastor since August of 1973.

During this time there has been a growing good relationship between the church and Southeastern Seminary. Also during this time the church has made numerous improvements of the facilities such as: air-conditioning, construction of a fellowship hall, building of a tennis court, remodeling classrooms, adding a baptistry, adding central heat and air, purchase of piano for fellowship hall, a new roof, and the purchase of an activity bus.

As one examines the history of Pine Ridge there are several observations which can be made. The first observation is that the church is the center of the activities of the community. This is largely due to the recognition and interest of the church in people as total beings.

Another observation is the quest of the church as it historically has continued moving toward a well defined institution. This has been affirmed in a number of ways. Most recently was the adoption of the first constitution of the church. In the last couple of years there has been the organization of a church council and active standing committees. A by-product of this process is that the deacons have been freed of the task of "running" the church so they now have an opportunity to lead the church in "ministry."

Other testimonies occur which some might label as maturity whereas some others might label these testimonies as irresponsible. First, January of 1976 marked the first time women were allowed to hold the office of deacon. Another testimony to growth is that youth today at Pine Ridge are constitutionally insured a voice in the church as well as being insured training opportunities. A young person is required by the constitution to serve on each of the standing committees.

Like many other Baptist Churches, Pine Ridge has experienced it's share of problems, but the focus of the church is that, at Pine Ridge, one can find a relationship with a group of Christians seeking a "way of life in Jesus Christ."

We ask for the prayers of our brothers and sisters throughout the association. We are thankful for our relationship to you through our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Announcement was made through the W.M.U. report of the Annual W.M.U. Associational Meeting at Samaria April 5.

Rev. Shannon Schott, Sunday School Director, announced Vacation Bible School Clinics would be held on Monday at Cedar Rock and Tuesday at Samaria from 7:15 to 9:15.

Rev. Donald Wagner announced through the Brotherhood report that the R. A. Track meet would be at Pilot April 10.

Rev. Bill Almond reported on the Proposed Deacons School, giving outline of plans and made a motion that the committee be allowed to continue with plans for the school. The motion passed.

Rev. A. S. Tomlinson reported an ordination service was held at Peachtree recently for their new pastor, Rev. R. L. McCormick.

The Pastor of Ranklinton church reported Mr. Jim Rivers of their church had been licensed to preach.

RECOMMENDATION CONCERNING YOUTH COUNCIL PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Reverend Forrest Gale of Maple Springs, the Reverend Don Bickers of Flat Rock and the Reverend Charles White of Pine Ridge served as members of a planning Committee from the Pastors Conference to study the needs and make proposals upon the findings to the Spring Associational Meeting concerning an Associational Youth Council.

This Committee suggests that there be established an Associational Youth Council made up of 5 members with the members being given the authority to elect their own officers. We further suggest that these members be selected according to geographic areas with no two members being selected from the same general area. These members are to be nominated annually by the Associational Nominating Committee and voted upon by the Association.

This committee wishes to recommend the following as the functions of this proposed Youth Council:

(1) The Council is to provide a structured form of communication and planning for associational youth work.

(2) The Council will make recommendations based on youth input and interest concerning opportunities of worship and fellowship.

(3) Each member of the Council will be responsible for maintaining lines of communication from area assemblies to the Council. (Area assemblies will be foremed by 2 representatives, one youth and one adult, from each church wishing to participate. Each church will have the opportunity to choose the most compatible group for the youth of their church.)

This committee's final recommendation is that this Council be established immediately with the following people serving as members of the Council for the remainder of this associational year: The Reverend Larry Boswell, the Reverend Jack Sammons, the Reverend Ronnie Arndt, Billy Britt and the Reverend Charles White.

We make these recommendations to the Tar River Baptist Association in the spirit and the belief that Christian maturity

is enhanced by Christian fellowship.

HISTORY OF CORINTH BAPTIST CHURCH

While the history of Corinth Baptist Church dates back to 1785, it must be noted that the congregation has changed names and location several times. In 1785 the church was called Toole's Meeting House. Sometime later the name was changed to Crocker's Chapel. When the congregation moved to a location between Rocky Ford and Ingleside the name became Haywood Meeting House and later was changed to Haywood Baptist Church.

Following the civil war, Brother Peter Dement gave the land for the present site. The old Haywood Church property was sold to the black Baptist in the community, who started a church of their own. Many of the Blacks had been members of the church during slavery days. Today they still continue under the name Haywood Baptist Church.

Several buildings have been erected on the present church property. The congregation chose the name Corinth when it moved into the first building on this site. Before long that building became too small and a new larger frame one was built close by in 1911 or 1912. That building was destroyed by fire in 1925. The dedicated members of Corinth went to work rebuilding and the present building stands as a memorial to their labors.

Other physical improvements have been made in recent years. In the years following World War II, under the leadership of Rev. Jack Wilder, a central heating system was installed and improvements made on the Church grounds. During the ministry of Gilbert Mister the Sunday School annex on the left side of the sanctuary was built and paid for. Rev. Jessie Parker led in the starting of a building fund for a parsonage. Mr. George Fuller gave a plot of land in the Moulton community and in 1963 the present parsonage was built. The first family to live in the new parsonage was that of Rev. Billy Martin. On January 3, 1965 he led in the note burning for the \$15,000 parsonage. This left the church debt free. The same fall the 135th annual session of the Tar River Baptist Association met at Corinth. Rev. J. Marion Rector, pastor of Corinth brought greetings to messengers, pastors, and visitors on behalf of the host church and Mountain Grove Church, who assisted with preparations for the meeting and with the food.

In October, 1973 a new educational building was built on the right of the sanctuary. The building consisted of four Sunday School rooms, a bathroom, and a basement-kitchen. This was done under the leadership of Rev. Mackie K. Bazen, Jr.

The spiritual life of Corinth has been enriched by all of its many pastors, including such giants as Dr. W. R. Cullom, B. E. Morris, Dr. Garland Hendrix, Dr. Paul Caudill, Henry Barnette, and many others.

Ties with the Tar River Association go back many years. In 1849 the annual meeting was held with the Haywood Baptist Church and again in 1871. The first meeting with Corinth was held in 1901. In 1936 the Association again met at Corinth and Rev. John Edwards, having been ordained by Corinth preached the Associational sermon.

Corinth can well be proud of her 191 year history and can sing..."To God be the glory, great things he hath done..." and as we look to the future we pray..."lead on, O King eternal..."

HISTORY OF MOUNTAIN GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

In about 1895 worship services were held in a one room log school house in the Alert Community. The Rev. John Colbert would come and preach once a month. About a year later Mr. Joseph H. Murray organized a Sunday School. In 1900 the Rev. Colbert retired. In that same year the Rev. G. W. Holmes began preaching twice a month on Saturday afternoon and Sunday.

In 1901 Mountain Grove Baptist Church was organized with the Rev. Holmes as its first pastor. The Church continued to use the school building until 1902 when a church building was begun. Building materials and labor were furnished by the people, a foreman was employed.

Mountain Grove joined the Tar River Association in 1904. From this time the church experienced the typical rural church growth and improvements. A larger building was built, later on an adequate Sunday School facility was added. With God's material blessings and the dedication of his people the church has continued to grow.

The inside was completely renovated with new pews, furniture, baptistery and stained glass windows added. In 1968 a parsonage was built. The most recent improvements were the brick vaneering of the Church and the addition of a steeple. We of Mountain Grove are grateful to God and to the founders, and all who had a part in a church that we love so much.

Mrs. Donald Jones reported the W.M.U. had a good Leadership Conference. She said Heck Jones Offering was short and more money was needed if the W.M.U. paid the balance of indebtedness on Camp Munda Vista.

The treasurer's report showed a balance as of August 31, 1976 was \$6433.96.

Rev. Shannon Scott reported 2 churches had participated in the special emphasis program on enrolment in Sunday School.

The proposed budget for 1977 was adopted after one change to be presented to the Association.

HISTORICAL SUMMARY FOR 1976

The Tar River Association of North Carolina Baptists met for the Fall Session of 1975 with the Pearce Baptist Church. The Poplar Springs Church was co-host. The Calendar of Activities adopted for 1976 included a Layman's Witnessing Institute to be held February 20-21; and encouragement to the churches to observe the 1976 Bicentennial of our National Declaration of Independence with appropriate concern for our spiritual state, in addition to the set feature of the year. The 1976 budget of \$17,800.00 adopted is a record for the Association.

The Association heard a report on a new feature of our State Convention known as "Happiness Retreat for Exceptional Persons" at Fort Caswell. The Churches arranging for some of their "Exceptional Persons" to have that week at Caswell reported such pleasure in this new venture that they plan to participate in the program in 1976 and encouraged other Churches to search out the Eligible persons of their communities. August 12-14, 1976 at Fort Caswell was again the truly "Happiness Retreat" for these exceptional persons from all of North Carolina, including Tar River Association.

The annual spring session of the Associational Women's

Missionary Union met with the Samaria Baptist Church, April 5th. The Association met in the spring Session with the Ephesus Church assisted by the Pine Ridge Church as co-host April 26. The Bicentennial theme, "Let's Show our Colors" was followed. Editor Marse Grant of the Biblical Recorder spoke on "Celebration of Bicentennial." The session approved the formation of an Association Youth Council recommended by the Pastor's Conference of February 8. This Council, working on an area basis, includes representative youth from the Churches.

Historical summaries of the Pearce and Poplar Springs Churches are included in the Association Minutes of 1975. The summaries of Ephesus and Pine Ridge will be in the 1976 minutes.

The Churches report these events of this Bicentennial year: Bailey set in motion a long range building program including the renovation of the Sanctuary this year.

Bunn purchased an ALLEN ORGAN for their Sanctuary.

Castalia published a brief history of the Church.

Ephesus enjoyed the beginning of a new Youth Choir directed by Mrs. Rebecca Edwards. On July 4th observed the Bicentennial of the Declaration of Independence with a patriotic emphasis including period costumes, a picnic, and the adoption of Church Constitution.

Flat Rock organized a Young Adult Sunday School Class on Easter Sunday and was awarded the "America 76" Certificate by the N. C. Sunday School Department. Participating in the recently established Association Youth Activities Council entertained a Festival of Youth Choirs including Flat Rock, Bethlehem, and Harris Chapel on July 18. Their Pastor, the Rev. Don Bickers was commissioned a Chaplain in the U. S. Air Force and ordered to active duty at the end of May, 1976.

Harris Chapel moved to set up a Church library and leased a van for Church related activities.

Hopkins Chapel received the Sunday School Board Achievement Award for an Advance Vacation Bible School in 1976.

Peachtree celebrated the Bicentennial erecting and dedicating a new outside Bulletin Board at their second Annual Senior Citizen's Luncheon, February 13. Sunday, February 22 the Church ordained her new Pastor, Robert L. McCormick, to the full Gospel Ministry. Rev. A. S. Tomlinson conducted the Service, the Rev. O. Anderson of Roland, N.C., former Pastor of Mr. McCormick, preached the sermon, and Mr. Joe Savage led the ordaining prayer and Laying On of Hands. The Rev. Robert L. McCormick led in the Benedictory prayer. After the reception for the new Minister, his wife, children, and mother, dinner was served in the Fellowship Hall for all. On July 4th the Church held "Ma Tumps" day celebrating the one hundredth birthday of Mrs. Tumps May. Improvements to the buildings included installation of a new heat air plant and renovation of the furnace room for walk-in convenience; double doors from Education Building to Sanctuary and folding doors to set off space at the rear of the Sanctuary; Rest rooms for men were relocated and improved. A new Youth Choir now leads Sunday Evening worship and answers invitations to sing for other Churches.

Perry's Chapel installed new lighting for the Sanctuary and provided an office study for the Pastor at the Church.

Philadelphia placed air-conditioning unit in the parsonage during late fall of 1975, erected a steeple for the Church building, received the gift of a new piano for the Sanctuary, and began taping Church services to be carried to persons unable to attend Church.

Pleasant Grove dedicated their new Parsonage November 23, 1975.

Poplar Springs added air-conditioning to the Parsonage in fall of 1975.

Ransdell Chapel constructed a Parsonage and Superintendent of Missions, the Rev. Charles P. Burchette announced that when Rev. George Darnell, his wife and child moved into the new Parsonage in June 1976, all Tar River Churches have Pastor living in Church homes in the community for the first time. National Bicentennial celebration was observed July 3-4. The Rev. E. E. Crawford, a former Pastor, assisted in the special observance. The Church subscribed to the BIBLICAL RECORDER on the "Every Member Plan," and adopted the Deacon Family Ministry Plan.

Rock Springs received gifts of Brass Chandeliers and a new Communion Set; began a new Children's Choir. Building and Grounds improvements include a new ceiling for the Sanctuary and an attractive Bulletin Board erected on N. C. Highway No. 39 near the entrance to the Church Property.

Samaria added a steeple to their building.

Sandy Creek celebrated 206 years of being a Church of Jesus Christ with Homecoming Observance of the Bicentennial, Sunday, September 26, 1976. After dinner on the grounds a "camp meeting" sing followed. The Pastor, Rev. Doyal Conley, led the Church in thanksgiving to the Lord for the blessings the Church has realized during these 206 years.

Union Chapel reported heavy damage to their Education Building by fire.

Union View added a Youth Director to their staff, Mr. John Barnhardt. A Baptistry was installed.

Wood set up a lighting system for the Recreation area. County Church League Softball teams used this field for the 1976 schedule.

Notes and events of interest reported by the churches and not included in Historical Summary are recorded as follows:

BUNN - Purchased a new Allen organ.

CEDAR ROCK - Ordination Service for Ray Slone (Pastor), Centennial Church Celebration this year, lighted cross and velvet curtains for pulpit donated by Memorial Committee.

EPHESUS - Adopted a church constitution and bylaws. Established Crisis Fund. Built Tennis court on church grounds. Pastorium carpeted and repairs made. Held "Old Timers Day" commemorating our Nations 200th birthday. The Tar River Association met at our Church Spring Session April 26.

FRANKLINTON - Made first Christmons and had a Christmon tree; held BiCentennial Celebration. Fire escape added. Carpeted office area, and repaired our stained glass windows.

HARRIS CHAPEL - Library and Library Committee was formed. A church van was leased. The Tennis Court and Basketball Court were finished. Hospital Ministry was formed.

MAPLE SPRING - Began Hospital Ministry 1976. The Renn family dedicated silver candlesticks in memory of Mr. C. O. Renn.

MOUNTAIN GROVE - Steeple installed on church.

PEACHTREE - Ordination for Pastor Rev. Robert L. McCormick. Observed 100th birthday of Mrs. John May on July 4, 1976, she is oldest member of our church.

PHILADELPHIA - New steeple installed at cost of \$6600.00. An Allen organ was given as memorial gift. Purchased new piano for Sanctuary. Insulated the pastorium.

PILOT - The family of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde L. Pearce dedicated to the church thirteen framed 8 X 10 pictures of all the former Pastors of Pilot Baptist Church.

SAMARIA - Steeple erected April 16, 1976 at a cost of \$9570.76. SANDY CREEK - Observed Bi-Centennial (206 years old) on September 26, 1976. Broke all Sunday School attendance records with 332 present. Voted to build an addition to Educational plant.

STANHOPE - Pastorium was sold

UNION HOPE - Held Annual fall Homecoming. Called new Pastor.

WHITE LEVEL - Brass candle holders as Memorial gift for Mr. Joe Inscoe and deceased of Ladies Adult Class No. 3.

WOOD - Lighted ball field and recreation area. New chairs for choir.

RANSDELL CHAPEL - The Pastor and his family moved into a rented Pastors home on the Church field. Special Bicentennial activities were held July 3 and 4 with a former pastor Rev. C. E. Crawford of Advance, N.C. returning for the morning worship service the 4th. The Church subscribed for the Biblical Recorder through the "Every Member Plan." The Deacon Family Ministry Plan was adopted by the Church. Brother Charlie Dickens has been active in our church for 50 years. Sandy Darnell was licensed.

TIME, PLACE COMMITTEE REPORT

We recommend that the Association be held as previously recommended as follows:

1977 Spring: Bailey with Social Plains and Union Hope assisting

Fall: Cedar Rock with Hickory and Pleasant Grove assisting

1978 Spring: Harris Chapel with Bethlehem and Rock Springs assisting

Fall: Louisburg with Maple Springs and Duke Memorial assisting

We also recommend that: The Time, Place Committee be nominated as usual but that they recommend a place for meeting and those to assist but only for one year at a time. The next recommendation will be for the year 1979.

TRUSTEE'S REPORT

This year the trustees had only minor repairs at the missionary's house. The Trustees feel that the missionary's house is in good condition at the present.

Constitution

ARTICLE I -- NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II -- PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

ARTICLE III -- MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet biannually in the Fall and Spring. The Fall session shall be primarily for business and the Spring session primarily for inspiration. The Annual Sermon shall be delivered during the Spring Season.

ARTICLE IV -- RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, and approval by a credentials committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator shall give the Messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V -- DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; messengers; give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter, these to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VI -- POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches, and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or

church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII - OFFICERS

The officers of the association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer (with the privilege of combining the office of Clerk and Treasurer), Auditor, Historian, Trustees, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Stewardship Chairman, Chairman of the Social Services Committee, and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee. The Moderator, the Vice-Moderator, the Clerk, the Historian, the Trustees, the Chairman of the Social Services Committee and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence at the conclusion of the session. The Treasurer and the auditor shall be elected at the Fall Meeting and their terms of office shall commence in January 1. The Sunday School Director, the Church Training Director, the Woman's Missionary Union Director, the Brotherhood Director, the Music Director, the Chairman of Evangelism and the Stewardship Chairman are to be elected in the spring meeting of the association and their terms of office shall commence upon election. The above officers shall be elected annually. At such times as the Association shall elect a Director of Missions, he becomes an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, to enforce the rules, to preserve order, and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also serve ex-officio chairman of the Executive Committee of the Association. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, to serve as Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and to serve as Chairman of the Missions Committee.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the body, and use all diligence in having same printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible, to mail the church clerks reminders by church letters forthcoming and to keep on hand the printed Minutes and other important documents belonging to the body. He shall also serve as ex-officio secretary of the Executive Committee.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse the moneys contributed for the expenses of the body as authorized by the Executive Body.

E. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and report to the Association annually.

F. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and to report at the annual session of the Association.

G. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to respond, within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special Committees authorized by the Association.

H. It shall be the duty of the Associational Church Training Director to

promote the interests of Church Training within the bonds of the Association and to make to the Association as annual report of the work accomplished.

I. It shall be the duty of the Associational Sunday School Director to promote the interests of the Sunday Schools within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

J. It shall be the duty of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union within the Director to promote the interests of the Woman's Missionary Union within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished. This officers election may be a confirmation of election by the Associational Womans Missionary Union.

K. It shall be the duty of the Associational Brotherhood Director to promote interests of the Brotherhood within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

L. The Association Music Director shall plan and direct the music for all meetings of the Association and its Executive Committee and shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music in the churches of the Association.

M. Three (3) trustees shall be elected from the membership of the Association to hold title of all property of the Association, to act under the direction of the Association through its Executive Committee to execute necessary legal documents, and to supervise the maintenance of all property belonging to the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive by purchase, gift or otherwise title to real and personal property and to see, convey or mortgage same for the use and benefit of said Association and it officers and agents upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of said Tar River Association.

The trustees shall also be responsible for and keep an undated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association. An additional copy of this inventory shall be filed with the Treasurer and at the Associational Office.

Trustees are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

N. It shall be the duty of the Associational Stewardship Chairman to both encourage and keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the stewardship of the total Christian life and witness. He shall make an annual progress report to the Association.

O. The Moderator shall appoint the Parliamentarian at each session of the Association and/or Executive Committee Meeting.

ARTICLE IX -- EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Associational Officers as setforth in Article VII, Director Missions, Moderator for past year, and Pastor and two members from each participating Church. Each church shall elect two members to serve on the Executive Committee prior to the regular Fall Annual Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Director Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee and does not have the power to vote.

C. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

1. The Executive Committee of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary and to define his duties.
2. To act for the Association between regular sessions of the body.
3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.
4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the Annual Budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the

raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.

6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Committee in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

ARTICLE X -- OTHER COMMITTEES

The following committees whose duties are prescribed below shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the Fall Meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the Fall Meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new committee will take office.

A. Nominating Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to nominate the members of the various committees and Chairmen and associational officers deemed necessary to facilitate the work of the Association. The Nominating Committee will be appointed hereafter by the Moderator of the Association. This Committee shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. Credentials Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to provide the Association with Authority for operation to determine the extent of the powers of the Association and to examine Articles of Faith and recommend the admission of new churches to the Association. It is the duty of this Committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association by badges as voting members of the Association.

D. Finance Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to propose a budget to the Executive Committee and to suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. The Committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. This Committee shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer shall serve as ex-officio member of this committee.

D. Resolutions Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to receive all resolutions presented to the Association.

This Committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting, Officers of the Association, etc.

E. Time, Place and Preacher Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational Meeting.

F. Missions Committee composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Chairman, Stewardship Chairman, and three (3) members at large, whose duty will be to assist the Director of Missions in the planning, promoting, and execution of Associational programs making recommendations to the Executive Committee.

G. Program Committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association whose duty shall be to receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Missions Committee Chairman, Director of Missions) draft and present the program, in printed form, for the sessions of the Association, which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business. The host pastors shall be included in this Committee.

H. Constitutional Committee shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes.

I. Social Services Committee shall be composed of one representative each of

the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Homes for Aging and Baptist Hospital whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of these institutions.

J. Christian Education Committee shall be composed of a Christian Literature Representative, a Christian Education Representative, and one member at large whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

ARTICLE XI -- ORDAINING COUNCIL

In order to preserve the Baptist position with reference to the divine call to the ministry, and to recognize the responsibility of a local church to the entire Baptist denomination, the Association shall elect annually an ordaining council that may act in an advisory capacity for churches seeking its assistance. In setting up this Council and in its work, the following things are to be noted:

A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership and the request from the church come to the Association through the Moderator or the Association Office.

B. That the church in which the candidate holds membership elect to the Council three members, one of them the pastor, provided he is not the candidate for ordination.

C. That the Tar River Association elect six members to constitute a standing ordaining council, to serve with the three members appointed by the local church, one of which shall be designated chairman by the Moderator. These shall serve terms of three years, and shall be ineligible to succeed themselves.

D. That the Council then proceed in the usual Baptist method and policy for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

E. That we encourage insofar as it is practical public ordination services.

F. That the Tar River Association furnish the minister thus set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry by this Council with credentials signed by the Moderator and Clerk of the Association and by each member of the Council.

ARTICLE XII -- VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XIII -- AMENDMENTS

This Constituion or the By-Laws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment (s) will be presented to afternoon session and voted on no earlier than evening session.

ARTICLE XIV -- PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert Rules of Order.

BY-LAWS

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. All resolutions must be stated in writing and handed to the Clerk.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.

10. Reports of Committees on Convention objects must be brief - that on Missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

13. The Clerk and Treasurer shall receive honorariums to be determined by the Executive Committee for their services as an expression of appreciation.

14. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

HISTORY OF UNION HOPE BAPTIST CHURCH

The members of the Union Hope Community felt that there was a great need for a place to have Sunday School and church. So in 1936 when the Union Hope school was consolidated with the Ferrell's school, the members of the community purchased the Union Hope Schoolhouse for \$75.00. On Sunday afternoon, August 23, 1936, according to previous announcement and unanimous consent of those interested the Union Hope Baptist Church was organized.

The church began that day with twenty-six people coming to unite with the church. Some of these are still with us today. Over the years God has blessed with those twenty-six people growing to over 260.

As the church grew, the people began to move forward in faith and by 1954 the little church that began to worship on the third Sunday afternoon of each month was now engaged in worship each Sunday morning and conducted a Wednesday evening prayer meeting.

God has also blessed the church over the years as the people have watched their facilities grow from that school building into a building which is more suitable for Sunday School and with a new sanctuary, which was completed in May, 1974.

God has also given us the privilege of seeing three young men from our church enter into the ministry: Leroy Trevathon, Jackie Bryant, and Patrick Corbett.

Those who have been pastors of this congregation are: Theo Davis, J. N. Stancil, Dale Davis, Roy Smith, James G. Robinson, Carroll A. Veatch, Walter H. Mayes, Joe W. Chandler, Kenneth Childers, Stewart Smith, Larry Vickery, William R. Bell, and the present pastor, Gary Rickman.

Truly the Lord has been abundant with His blessings to the Union Hope Baptist Church. We praise His Holy Name. The prayer of this church is that God shall use us in a greater way to the advancement of His Kingdom.

HISTORY OF SOCIAL PLAINS BAPTIST CHURCH

The Social Plains Baptist Church, Route # 2, Zebulon, North Carolina, has had a rich, full history. The church was organized in 1833 with twelve charter members. They were Keuser, Calvin, Sidney, Bryant, John Martha, Jane E., Mary A., and Lucy Alford, Phinuhus and Nancy Puckett and S. B. Bunn.

The growth of the church was very slow. In 1918, there were only thirty members and a budget of only 63.00.

When a church conference was called, there were very few present -- six or seven -- and it was up to these few members to support the church budget.

The membership in 1921 totaled thirty-four. The budget has increased to \$65.00 a year. It was at this time that the church decided to initiate a Sunday evening worship service. Prior services had been held on Saturday.

The church imposed upon its members strict and forbidding regulations. If a member were absent from services three Sundays in succession, he was dismissed from the fellowship unless he could give a good reason. Unruly behaviour also constituted grounds for dismissal.

The church was expanding. In 1925, the membership had grown to forty-five and the budget now boasted of \$75.00.

In 1930, the membership had increased to sixty-five and the pastor's salary was \$53.00.

During the year 1935, the membership had decreased to sixty and the pastor's salary to \$30.29. The members pledged \$116.00 for the budget that year, and only \$59.95 was turned in. That year marked the beginning of mission offerings being sent.

The church lost a number of its members to the newly organized Union Hope Baptist Church in the neighboring community in 1936. Following this there were two or three years when it looked as if the church would be disbanded, but under the leadership of its pastor, the Reverend Julius F. Holloway, it staged a comeback in 1939.

The pastor's salary increased in 1940 to \$75.00 per year. There was also an increase in the mission budget.

Seeing the inadequacy of their church building, the members, under the most able leadership of Rev. A. D. Parrish, began making plans for a building fund. This was in 1950 with a budget of only \$500.00.

In 1955, the logs were cut and the foundation for a new sanctuary was laid. The work was largely done by the members and friends of the church. The sanctuary was completed in 1956 at a cost of \$6050.00.

Work began on the new educational building in 1957. The members again cut logs, hauled them to the saw mills, and helped prepare the lumber for the building. The foundation for the educational building was laid on March 20, 1957 and it was complete in 1959.

The last service to be held in the old church was on March 25, 1956. The first service in the new church was on Easter Sunday, April 1, 1956, with homecoming and dedication services held on Sunday, April 8, 1956, with the Associational Missionary, Rev. V. E. Duncan, delivering the message.

For the first time in its history, 1958, the church borrowed money--\$3,992.76 from the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company--to be used to complete the educational building and install the heating system.

In 1966 a fiberglass baptistry was installed. Minor additions were made in the educational building, including the division of two classrooms into smaller rooms allowing for additional age group classes.

The first G. A. Coronation Service in the church's history was held on March 19, 1967 with four young ladies being crowned queen -- Debbie Jones, Gail Carlyle, Carolyn Jones, and Connie Debnam.

In 1967, choir robes and an organ was purchased. The organ was purchased with pledge from some of the members.

In 1971, an air conditioning system was installed in the sanctuary and the educational plant.

The old church building has been moved several times, and in 1964, remodeling was started to turn it into a community building. The building was sheet-rocked, painted, cabinets installed and a kitchen furnished with sink, refrigerator, and two stoves. In 1974 an addition was added on to the community building to provide for more room for church functions. This included more storage space, an inside grill, and two bathrooms. This building will be used for the many social events of the church and to develop a closer fellowship within the church and the community at large.

On April 13, 1969, the church voted to construct a pastorium in the community. The foundation was laid in September, 1969, and the parsonage completed in November 1972, at a cost of \$15,697.24.

In 1976 the parsonage was air conditioned and an air condition fund was started for the community building.

During the past several days the church budget has grown from \$2,505.00 in 1962-63 to the present 1976-77 budget of \$12,663.50. The present membership is eighty-one resident and forty-five non-resident members.

Total cost of the present church property was approximately \$30,000.00. Today the property is valued at approximately \$100,000.00.

Pastors who have served Social Plains Church are as follows: Rev. Raeford Driver (1883-1889), Rev. J. G. Cottingham (1889-1900), Rv. G. W. Coppage (1900-1903), Rev. J. W. Sledge (1903-1914), Rev. A. L. Goodrich (1914-1915), Rev. A. R. Gay (1915-1918), Rev. W. M. Hartsel (1918-1919), Rev. J. W. Nobles (1919-1935), Rev. Theo Davis (1935-1937), Rev. W. A. Cone (1937-1938), Rev. Julius F. Holloway (1938-1943), Rev. M. M. Turner (1943-1944), Rev. P. F. Hardy (1944-1945), Rev. Walter Moose (1945-1947), Rev. A. D. Parrish (1948-1956), Rev. E. M. Rhyner (1956-1959), Rev. Gene K. Hiers (1959-1963), Rev. Carroll Spivey (1963-1968), Rev. Eugene Hatcher (1968-1969), Rev. Ronald Rowe (1970-1972), Rev. Leslie H. Parrish (1972-1976), and Rev. Bruce Martin (present pastor).

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association, and I quote from our constitution, is composed of the Associational Officers, Superintendent of Missions, Moderator for past year, and Pastor and two members from each participating church. Each church shall elect two members to serve on the Executive Committee prior to the regular Fall Annual Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

One of the duties of this Committee is to act for the Association between regular sessions of the body.

Since we last met for our regular session in October, this Committee has met quarterly (twice) on December 13, 1976 and March 28, 1977.

Attending the December Meeting were 47 members representing 25 churches.

At a prior meeting there was some discussion on plans for feeding Messengers at our Association. The Time, Place, Preacher Committee offered the following recommendation which was adopted. "Recommends that the host church serve with the assisting churches, a simple meal. That if the host church and those assisting desire to serve more than a simple meal the cost of same shall be shared by the churches involved in serving that day.

A Motion was passed for the Trustees to take care of some plumbing work needed at the Missionary's home.

A recommendation from the Pastor's Conference for a change of calendar for the Associational Youth Meeting was adopted.

Reports were heard from Committee Chairmen, W. M. U., Treasurer and our Missionary.

In March the meeting was attended by 59 members representing 27 churches.

Mr. Burchette gave cards to those churches who had not already received them, to be filled out and sent back as to whether your church would like to be host to the Meeting of the Association, this would help the Time, Place Committee.

Mrs. Carter Holmes in her W. M. U. report placed emphasis on the Annual W. M. U. Associational Meeting to be April 4.

Mr. Burchette reported we received \$1,560.00 financial help from the Baptist State Convention.

The Brotherhood Director from the Pilot Church announced that along with the "Bold Mission Thrust" emphasis, a group of 4 christian business men would depart April 20 for at least two weeks on the Island of Bardadis. It would cost \$600.00 per person. Some help would be provided by their church. They adopted this project to help with building, repairing churches or whatever task they could perform. They ask if others were interested in going to let them know, they would be glad to have others.

Reports from Committees and Treasurer were adopted.

HISTORY OF BAILEY BAPTIST CHURCH

September 26, 1909, became a day to remember to Baptist in the Bailey area. On that day the Rev. J. W. Nobles, State Missionary, J. H. Grice, and G. W. Finch met at Rock Springs Schoolhouse for the purpose of establishing a Missionary Baptist Church. Presenting letters for membership were J. P. Underwood, Sr., R. L. Underwood, L. R. Finch, B. L. Taylor and Daughter, Mrs. Ellen Finch, and Miss Mary Underwood.

Mr. Nobles was appointed moderator and clerk, and duly recorded this meeting. J. P. Underwood, Sr. was chosen deacon, with R. L. Underwood as clerk. Mr. Nobles agreed to remain as pastor until December of the same year. The Articles of Faith, Church Covenant, and rules of order taken from Pendleton's Church manual were adopted. Thus was constituted the Missionary Baptist Church of Baley, Nash County, North Carolina.

At the first conference held on October 17, 1909, the church voted to request membership in the Johnston Baptist Association, and was accepted the same month. A Building committee was appointed and a church building was soon erected on what is now Highway 581.

During the early years of World War II as the need for expansion increased, our pastor, P. P. Hartsell led the church in a building program. The lot where our present church stands on Highway 264 was purchased from W. H. Farmer and Brother, for \$2,500. Two thousand dollars of this sum was donated by this company. The old church building was sold to Mr. B. M. Farmer, who converted it into an apartment house called "Gospel Apartments".

Ground breaking for the educational building and basement was held in 1947. Construction on the main auditorium was started in July 1950. In November 1956, the Bailey Missionary Baptist Church, with a membership of 168, was formally dedicated.

Plans for the pastorium were begun in 1957, and the building was completed in 1959. Mrs. Mary High, the former Mary Underwood, charter member, donated a large portion of the money for this building. It was at this time that our church changed from the Johnston Association to the Tar River Association.

Pastors who have served our church in these years of our expansion and building programs are: Rev. P. P. Hartsell, Rev. J. W. Davis, Rev. Frank Zedick, Rev. Clyde Yates, Rev. J. Monte Bishop, Rev. Charles Allard, Rev. Todd Walter, Rev. Charles Kratz, and Rev. Jerry W. Turner.

Many challenges lie ahead for Bailey Baptist Church, membership of which is now 257. We are in the early stages of another building program. This program tentatively includes doubling the educational space by building a second floor to the education building, installation of a sound and recording system in the sanctuary, and resurfacing of the drives.

We look forward to the future, with a prayer in our hearts for our continued success.

AFTERNOON SESSION

1. The 147th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator at 4:00 P.M.

2. Mr. Dean Lamm with Mrs. Lamm at the piano, led the congregation in singing "Mine Eyes Have Seen The Glory".

3. Rev. Harry Floyd read scripture and led in prayer.

4. The Moderator asked for a Motion that the Pastors, Officers and Messengers present and those to come constitute this session of the Association. Rev. Charles Burchette made this Motion and it was passed.

5. Rev. Winfred Porter moved the printed program be the order of the day with any changed that might be necessary. Passed.

6. Rev. Charles Burchette introduced six new pastors since the Spring Meeting.

7. The Moderator appointed Rev. Donald Wagner as Parliamentarian for the Session.

8. Rev. Winfred Porter gave the History of Cedar Rock Church and moved its adoption. Adopted.

9. Rev. Jack Sammon gave the History of Rock Church and made Motion it be adopted. Adopted.

10. Rev. Norris Cook gave the History of Pleasant Grove Church and moved it be adopted. Adopted.

11. The W. M. U. Director was adsent, the Moderator read her report as printed in Book of Reports and it was adopted.

12. Rev. Shannon Scott presented his Sunday School Report as printed and moved its adoption, then spoke to his report. Report adopted.

13. Mr. Seth Washburn presented his Church Training Report as printed moved the report be adopted, then spoke to his report. Report adopted.

14. Mr. Lynn Lewis offered his Brotherhood Report as printed for adoption. Report adopted.

15. Mr. M. V. Parrish, Historian, had no report but spoke briefly to the group.

16. Mr. Dean Lamm led congregation in singing "We'll Work 'Til Jesus Comes".

17. Rev. Donald Wagner presented the report of the Long Range Planning Committee. The 18-member committee sent questionnaires to every church and worked in 5 sub-committees.

He made a Motion that the Constitution Amendments be adopted. The Motion was seconded and will be voted on in the evening session.

18. Rev. Donald Wagner presented the Finance Committee Report and made a Motion it be adopted as printed at end of the Constitution Amendments. Adopted.

19. Rev. Donald Wagner presented Job Description for Director of Missions. He feels it is adequate as from the 1967 printing. Copies were made available.

20. Rev. Lyman Wilson presented the Nominating Committee Report. Rev. Donald Wagner made a Motion to adopt the nominations of the Committee. Motion was seconded and passed.

21. Mrs. Miriam Burchette led in the Installation of Officers for the Association.

22. Rev. Donald Wagner reported as member of the General Board of North Carolina. He had been a member since July 12, 1977 when Mr. Frank Reed resigned because he was leaving the Association.

He expressed hope that each church would have one messenger to the State Convention Meeting in Charlotte, November 14-16.

23. Rev. Charles Burchette led the Memorial Service.

24. Rev. Charles Burchette announced his resignation which had already been done at the meeting of the Executive Committee September 26, and December 31, 1977.

He said he was going home, he would live in Winston Salem where some of the family members live. He would live about a block from Baptist Hospital which would mean a lot because he did not plan to quit serving. They would leave middle of December, the other two weeks would be his vacation for this year which he had not used.

He called Mrs. Burchette to join him for a few words. She returned to her seat and Mr. Burchette spoke to the congregation on "The Bold Mission Thrust" and said there is something to be accomplished.

He sang the hymn "I Surrender All" and called on three other Pastors to come to the front that people who felt led to some commitment could come and speak with them.

25. Mr. Seth Washburn led in a closing prayer and included prayer of thanksgiving for the meal.

26. Adjourned for supper.

EVENING SESSION

27. The Moderator at 7:30 P.M. called upon Mr. Dean Lamm to lead an opening hymn. "We're Marching To Zion" was sung.

28. Rev. Bruce Martin read scripture and led in prayer.

29. Rev. Donald Wagner made a Motion that the constitutional changes presented in the afternoon session be adopted. Motion was seconded and passed.

30. Mr. Guilford Bufkin gave the report of the Credentials Committee showing total registration 233 with all 43 churches represented. Report adopted.

31. The Resolutions Committee report was read by Rev. H. L. Floyd in the absence of Mrs. R. B. Freeman. He moved the report be adopted as printed in Book of Reports. Adopted.

32. Rev. Albert Lamm presented the Annuity report as printed and moved it be adopted. He spoke to the report. Adopted.

33. Mr. Maylon J. Frazier presented the printed Treasurer's report which was adopted.

34. The Moderator asked Mr. and Mrs. Burchette to go out for a moment.

He asked that we make a decision about giving Mr. Burchette a gift before he left.

Rev. Merlin Boone made a Motion to give him \$700.00, which would be \$100.00 for each year of service. Motion seconded and passed.

35. Rev. Merlin Boone made a Motion to pay the moving expenses of Mr. Burchette to Winston Salem. Motion seconded and after discussion when Rev. Albert Lamm revealed the fact that Mr. Burchette had someone who was going to move him for \$400.00, Rev. Merlin Boone made amendment to his motion to read \$400.00 for moving expense. The amendment was carried and then motion as amended passed.

36. The Chairman of Trustees was absent and so a Motion to adopt the printed report as in Book of Reports was passed.

37. Mrs. Willis R. Warren gave the Executive Committee Report which was adopted.

38. Mrs. W. B. Robertson presented the Proposed Budget for 1978, she moved the adoption of the Budget. Motion was seconded and speeches in opposition, also speeches for the Budget were heard. A vote was taken, 68 voted for and 11 opposed. Budget was adopted.

HISTORY OF CEDAR ROCK BAPTIST CHURCH

In the minutes of the Tar River Baptist Association of 1861 appeared the following: "Resolved that we learn with pleasure that patriotic young ladies of Cedar Rock are zealously exerting themselves to procure the means for ministering to our sick soldiers at Yorktown." At this time we had no church at Cedar Rock, but the seeds were planted in the hearts of our people.

About 1876 a few Christian men and women began a series of religious services at the old Cedar Rock Township Courthouse. In 1877 our first church building was built on the land which is now our church cemetery, and we came into the Tar River Association as a new church. In those days of stringent finances, the erection of this building was made by hard labor from: J. W. Sledge, J. F. Fulghum, J. H. Sledge, E. S. Green, R. R. Boone, J. M. Stallings, J. A. Coppedge,

A. C. Fisher, R. B. Gilliam, J. J. May, William Inscoc, Woodson Parrish, and others whom like the unknown soldiers whose graves are not marked, will receive their rewards in the great day of reckoning of the faithful.

Our first pastor, Rev. G. W. Newell, helped to scatter the pebbles of Christian influence that lives today in the lives of grandchildren of those faithful old soldiers of the cross.

It was while engaged in leading prayer meetings that Rev. J. W. Sledge felt the call to preach the gospel. He went out from our church as one of the leading ministers, organizers, and promoters of Christian Education of his day.

Pastors since that time are as follows: W. A. Smith, J. R. Everett, George Duke, J. H. Harper, J. P. Gulley, J. Louis Price, W. R. (Bill) Wallace, P. R. Downey, J. S. Hopkins, Raymond Long, Fred Poplin, Winston Pearce, Lonnie Reavis, E. Y. Averette, F. H. Scofield, Rex Campbell, T. H. Steen, Billie Gordon, L. H. Miller, R. H. Freeland, James H. Pernell, Allen Lawrence, Steve Perreu, Burke Holland, Robert Robbins, Ray Sloan, and our present pastor, Winfred Porter.

In 1941 the church brought six acres of land, including the old Cedar Rock School Building for \$1,000.000.

On Sunday morning, October 29, 1944, our beloved church building which had been built in 1877, was reduced to ashes by fire. Services were held in Edward Best High School until the old Cedar Rock School Building could be gotten in shape for use as a church.

October 7, 1951 was a glorious day in the life of the church. The first worship service was held in the new sanctuary. A standing vote of thanks was made to Mr. William Stallings, Chairman of the Building Committee, and those who worked with him to make our dream a reality.

In 1952 a Hammond Organ was purchased and a piano was added in 1954. Organ Chimes were donated by the Phil and Jim Inscoc families at a later time.

Sunday School was held in our new educational building on November 23, 1958 for the first time. Our fellowship hall in the basement was completed with a modern kitchen in 1964.

In June, 1960, the church sold the old school building and land on which it rested for \$2,000.00. The money was applied to the church indebtedness.

In August, 1960, an ordination service was held for Robert Rix Boone, Jr., a young man of our community and church, licensed to preach the gospel.

On November, 1961, we had a "Burning of the Church Mortgage Ceremony." Thanks was expressed to the chairman of the building committee, T.O. Nelms, and those who worked with him. We only had \$300.00 toward the cost when the foundation was laid.

The church library was organized in 1962. Our brick parsonage was completed in July, 1966. The John Jackson Dean Memorial Scholarship Loan Fund was established on December 14, 1970, with an initial gift of \$6,000.00. Donations were made to complete the sanctuary with stained glass memorial windows and new heating and air conditioning systems were installed in the sanctuary in 1971.

October 17, 1976 was a very important and joyous day in the life of our church as we celebrated our church's one hundredth birthday 1876-1976. Homecoming and the Centennial celebration involved a full day's activities: Sunday School, Morning Worship, and lunch. Recognition of former pastors present and their families was made and each of the pastors were given opportunity to make a short talk. A copy of the church history was read and a copy given to every family. A bountiful lunch was enjoyed by the huge crowd in our Fellowship Hall.

On October 24, 1976, our church called Mr. Winfred Porter as pastor. We repainted the exterior of our church, installed central heat and air conditioning in our educational building, decorated and furnished the pastor's study, and remodeled certain portions of our buildings during the year 1977.

Playing an important part in the life of the community, our Church is the center of its activities. The Spirit of the past still lives in this modern structure, and ties our people together with unity that is a promise for the future.

HISTORY OF HICKORY ROCK BAPTIST CHURCH

On August 1, 1915, a meeting was held at Hickory Rock Academy for the purpose of organizing a Missionary Baptist Church. Rev. George Duke presided over the meeting, Mr. G. B. West acted as Clerk, and Rev. J. H. Harper as reading clerk.

Church services were held in the Hickory Rock Academy until a new building could be constructed. Rev. George Duke was called as the first pastor.

In the fall of 1915 a new building was begun. Under the leadership of Mr. W. J. Dennis, Mr. R. D. Williams, Mr. E. H. Gupton, and great cooperation from the seventeen charter members, the building was completed in the spring of 1916.

The charter members were as follows: Mr. W. J. Dennis, Mrs. W. J. Dennis, Mr. J. H. Joyner, Mrs. J. H. Joyner, Mr. A. B. Inscoe, Mr. J. R. Inscoe, Mrs. J. R. Inscoe, Mr. R. H. Bobbitt, Mrs. Cora Bobbitt, Mr. J. R. Joyner, Mr. E. H. Gupton, Mrs. E. H. Gupton, Mr. Asbury Dennis, Mr. Frank Dennis, Miss Mary Dennis, Mr. Jake Dennis, and Mrs. O. B. Ball.

The first deacons of the newly founded church were Mr. W. J. Dennis and Mr. J. R. Joyner, while Mr. A. B. Inscoe became the first church clerk.

Rev. Sanky Blanton came to Hickory Rock to serve as pastor in 1923. He was then a student at Wake Forest College. During the 1930's Rev. Clarence Patrick served as pastor for Hickory Rock.

Under the leadership of Rev. John Edwards the church added a new wing for Sunday School rooms. During the next few years and under the leadership of Pastor Jack Roe, the church made plans for renovations and these plans were carried out during the time Rev. Wiley Guthrie was pastor. The wing was removed. Six Sunday School rooms were added and the church was bricked. A heating plant was installed and an organ purchased. Soon afterward a new piano was added, the sanctuary received a new carpet and a front porch was built.

With Rev. Henry C. Green, Jr. serving as pastor, groundbreaking for a new education building took place in the fall of 1962. This building became a reality the next year.

During the fall of 1966 a new heating and air conditioning plant was installed in the church sanctuary.

In 1969 the church built a parsonage, which was first occupied by Rev. Clay Cook and his family. We continued to make progress under the leadership of Rev. Jimmy Harrington. Our present pastor, Rev. Jack Sammons, has inspired us to do many things. Central air conditioning has been installed in both the parsonage and the educational building. Last year, 1976, we constructed a new building which we named the "Fellowship Building".

We thank God for those who have been called to serve. From the very beginning we have been blessed with outstanding pastors, several of whom have become known as "great".

HISTORY OF PLEASANT GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

Pleasant Grove Baptist Church was organized in 1851 after having held meetings under a bush arbor during the summer months on property belonging to N. W. Boddie. Information has been handed down and church census records show that N. W. Boddie built the first church structure on his land for the local people to hold worship services because of the distance to other churches and he was clerk of the church until 1875.

Thirty-six years later on January 24, 1887, property was deeded to the church by N. W. Boddie recorded in Deed Book 67, page 103, Nash County Registry, for 2 acres, "2 rods and 9 poles to have and to hold... so long as the church is held by the Missionary Baptists, and in case the church goes down then to revert to me and my heirs..."

Anna B. Bunn, sole heir at law of the original grantor, deeded all her right, title and interest in the same property in fee simple to the church by deed dated February 23, 1953, recorded in Deed Book 580, page 507, Nash County Registry.

The basic church structure, which when built, stood with its side towards the road, is still being used with additions and remodeling being done as the need has arisen.

In 1900 the structure was turned to face the road and enlarged, including the addition of a bay window pulpit section.

On April 4, 1910, copper collection plates were donated to the church by Willie Sutton and wife, Lizzie Sutton.

An old vacated school building was moved from across the road in 1934 and join onto the back of the church to form the educational department.

A church related community building was constructed in 1947 on the east side of the church containing a large assembly room, a kitchen, and a utility room.

On March 9, 1953, a deed of trust was given in the amount of \$4000.00 for money borrowed from Planters National Bank & Trust Company to brick-veneer the church and remodel and redecorate the sanctuary and landscape the yard. The project was completed in 1955 at a cost of approximately \$10,000.00. A year later restroom facilities were added in opposite ends of the hall behind the sanctuary leading to the educational department. On December 3, 1956, the deed of trust was cancelled of record.

New pews and other furniture was purchased and added at a cost of \$2369.17 on March 26, 1957. In order to help finance the project some of the old furniture was sold to another church and some members donated pews in memory of family and former members. A portion of the furniture not sold was moved to the educational department and community building. The pulpit furniture was donated by the L. W. Pullen family.

Soon thereafter on March 31, 1957, a dedication and note burning ceremony was held with a message "Resume' of Accomplishments" delivered by B. A. Mitchell, former pastor as guest speaker.

In October, 1959, the oil heater was removed from the community building and gas heaters installed in that building, nursery facilities added in the church and concrete walks completed.

On November 21, 1963, a deed of trust was given in the amount of \$14,000.00 for money borrowed from Planters National Bank & Trust Company to renovate and remodel the sanctuary, to install a baptistery, to construct a new educational department, to install electric heat, and to purchase new furniture for the educational department. The project was completed in late 1964 at an approximate cost of \$16,216.000 and the debt was paid and cancelled of record on December 3, 1968.

A new deep well was drilled at a cost of \$670.00 in 1970.

A new roof was put on the sanctuary in 1971 at a cost of \$1446.00.

Plans were approved and a project was begun to renovate and redecorate the sanctuary and to change and replace the canopy over the front doors in February, 1972. As a result of this project the canopy was changed to redwood facing with copper roof, candle light fixtures added by the front doors, paneling and chair rail added to the sanctuary and vestibule, two doors on either side of the vestibule leading into the sanctuary changed to a center opening, brownish-gold carpet installed, new coat hangers added, cornices and drapers added in the educational department, all interior and exterior of the sanctuary and educational department painted and the community building exterior painted. The total cost of this project amounted to approximately \$8,000.00.

The sign in front of the church was donated and erected in April, 1973, in memory of Eugene Garland Braswell by his family.

A dark oak desk and Bible stand were donated by Joseph and Florine C. Braswell in November, 1973.

On November 1, 1973, the first Constitution and By-Laws of the church was adopted under leadership of Pastor, Lonnie Ray Armstrong.

In the fall of 1974, the old pews estimated to be around one hundred years old and which were moved from the sanctuary into the educational department and the community building in 1964 were sold to members of the church and new folding tables and chairs purchased at a cost of \$730.00.

Wrought iron hand rails have been mounted this week at the front steps of the church in memory of Joseph Z. Hinton by his family.

On September 15, 1974, Lonnie Ray Armstrong, pastor serving both Pleasant Grove and Castalia Churches, resigned from both churches and the church dissolved its affiliation with Castalia on October 6, 1974, and became a full-time church for the first time on January 1, 1975, with Norris Cook serving as pastor.

Plans were made immediately to acquire additional property across the road adjoining the church property on which to construct a parsonage and to have the property surveyed to establish boundary lines. Survey was made by W. B. McIntyre, Civil Engineer, and it was established that the correct total acreage owned by the church was 3.22 acres and an additional .19 acres was donated by Aubrey D. and Peggy B. Woodruff by deed dated February 24, 1975, recorded in Book 295, page 26, Nash County Registry. Plans for a parsonage containing 1800 square feet at an estimated cost of \$40,000.00 were approved on February 9, 1975, and the construction began on February 22, 1975.

Pleasant Grove has contributed to community and denominational life since slavery days. Church census records indicate that there were as many as twelve slaves as members from 1861 to 1892. One slave and former member, C. E. Boddie, requested and was granted burial site behind the church and a marker placed at the grave inscribed "C. E. Boddie-died April 15, 1911--in his 75th year." Two other churches have been organized from Pleasant Grove, Viz: Corinth Baptist Church and Momeyer Baptist Church. Two ministers have come from its membership, Saley and Carlton McGregor, brothers.

On August 5, 1975, Miss Virginia Bridgers deeded to the church .68 acre tract of land with the understanding that the land would be used as additional cemetery space, deed recorded in Book 969, at page 879, Nash County Registry.

WMU REPORT 1976-77

The theme, Let the Church Stand Up, set the stage for an interesting year's work for the WMU of the Tar River Association.

Forty of the forty-three churches participated in some or all phases of WMU work during the past year. Effort was made to improve the effectiveness if the

organizations as well as to organize programs in churches where they did not exist.

Margaret W. Holmes was WMU director for the Tar River Association. Under her leadership emphasis was placed on teaching missions, being involved in missions, and supporting missions through prayer and giving.

Baptist Women under the guidance of Halcy Davis were responsible for two special events in 1976-77. The first was a Prayer Retreat which was held at Pilot Church on November 14 with Mrs. Ruth Costner of Raliegh as guest speaker. Mrs. Costner emphasized the need for prayer in the life of every Christian. The second event was a directors-pastors picnic held at Pilot Church on June 11.

The highlight of the WMU work was the Annual Associational meeting which was held at White Level Church in April with 225 present representing 40 churches. Red Bud and Hickory Rock churches assisted White Level in making this meeting successful as well as enjoyable. Mr. and Mrs. Ray Frye returned missionaries from Malaysia were the guest speakers. An interesting part of the afternoon session was the message of love and gratitude brought by Mrs. Lunn, a native of Malaysia, who is a friend of the Fries and who was visting in the United States. It was inspiring to hear her relate what changes had come into her life after she found Christ and what sacrifices she had made to follow Him. Everyone was impressed with the zeal, interest, and enthusaism this woman had for her work as a Christian and for the hope she had found in the witness of the Baptist missionaries who had been sent to her country.

Successful meetings were held at Maple Springs Church on May 14 by Nannette Warren for Acteens and at Cedar Rock on June 12 by Debbie Jones for Mission Friends.

Linda Patterson, the BYW director, was disappointed when she planned a banquet for the young women to be held at Social Plains Church on April 23 and only 5 from the Tar River Association indicated an interest in the Activity.

The Leadership Conference was held at Centerville Church on Sept. 20. This is one of the most important meetings of the year because it is intended to prepare WMU leaders for the new year's work. At this meeting local church leaders can get information as to their duties and responsibilities. They can also be inspired and challenged to join other Christians throughout the Association, the state, and the world to Let the Church Stand Up and get on with its mission of spreading the gospel.

I am confident that this committee's final report can be incorporated easily into our stated purposes and be a guide to us in future mission and ministry work.

ARTICLE II-- PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association. (the rest of this ARTICLE to be placed in ARTICLE VIII, subsection M).

ARTICLE V -- DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; messengers; give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter, these to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VI -- POWERS AND PREROGATIVE OF THE ASSOCIATION

* * *

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself by messenger or church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII -- OFFICERS

. . . At such times as the Association shall elect a Director of Missions, he becomes an officer of the Association. (Last sentence in the paragraph, changing title of Superintendent of Missions -- to Director).

ARTICLE VIII -- DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

* * *

C. . . . As soon as possible, to mail the church clerks reminders by church letters forthcoming,

* * *

G. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to respond, within the limits of his time and ability, (changing name from Superintendent -- to Director).

* * *

J. It shall be the duty of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director to promote (Changing name from Superintendent -- to Director).

K. It shall be the duty of the Associational Brotherhood Director to promote (Changing name from Superintendent to Director).

M. Three (3) trustees shall be elected from the membership of the Association to hold title of all property of the Association, to act under the direction of the Association through its Executive Committee to execute necessary legal documents, and to supervise the maintenance of all property belonging to the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive by purchase, gift or otherwise title to real and personal property and to sell, convey or mortgage same for the use and benefit of said Association and its officers and agents upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of said Tar River Association.

The trustees shall also be responsible for and keep an undated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association. An additional copy of this inventory shall be filed with the Treasurer and at the Association Office.

Trustees are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

* * *

O. The Moderator shall appoint the Parliamentarian at each session of the Association and/or Executive Committee Meeting.

ARTICLE IX -- EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Associational Officers as set forth in Article VII, Director of Missions, (Change in title)

B. The Director of Missions is an (Change in title)

C. * * *

1. The Executive Committee of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, . . . (change in title).

* * *

5. To recommend the annual meeting of the Association . . . , and to counsel with the Director of Missions (Change in title)

ARTICLE X -- OTHER COMMITTEES

The following committees whose duties are prescribed below shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the Fall Meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the Fall Meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new committee will take office.

* * *

C. Finance Committee (Change in name from Resolutions Committee to Finance Committee)

D. Resolutions Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to receive all resolutions presented to the Association.

This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting, Officers of the Association, etc.

* * *

F. . . . , Whose duty will be to assist the Director of Missions in the planning, (Change in title)

G. . . . , Missions Committee Chairman, Director of Missions, (Change in title)

H. Constitution Committee shall be composed of five members whose duty shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes. (the rest of the paragraph to be deleted).

ARTICLE XI -- ORDAINING COUNCIL

* * *

A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership and the request from the church come to the Association through the Moderator or the Association Office.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

We request that within the next two years that each local church contribute at least 3% per year of its total budget for Association Mission Work. We see the Association Budget needs being at least \$24,000.00 within the next two years.

JOB DESCRIPTION FOR DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

I. PLANNING -- COORDINATING -- PROMOTING

A. Planning

1. Develop annual objectives, measurable goals and proposals for their attainment through proper associational committees.
2. Assist in the preparation of the Association.
3. Planning or helping others plan association-wide campaigns and activities, (schools of missions, clinics, enlargement campaigns, etc.)
4. Plan long-range programs and goals as needed.
5. Planning for new resources in the churches.
6. Assist in providing for doctrinal discussions.

B. Coordinating

1. Administer all policies and instructions committed to him by the Association and its Mission Committee.
2. To work closely with the associational committees and associational officers in such a way as to help each group (1) determine its opportunities and objectives based on needs in the churches, and (2) determine its procedures and programs for achieving these objectives.
3. Correlate the work of all organizations and committees in the Association.
4. Serve as ex-officio member of all committees.
5. Supply to State and Southern Convention agencies information about needs, problems, and potentialities within the Association.
6. Interpret to churches the program resources and other assistance available from the Local, Association, State and Southern Baptist Convention agencies.

C. Promoting

1. Associational activities.
2. Denominational causes and activities.
3. Promote opportunities for fellowship among the churches, pastors, pastors' wives, deacons, and associational and denominational leaders.

4. Encourage churches and workers through publicity, public commendation, letters, and personal contacts.
5. Encourage associational officers and leaders to take advantage of training opportunities offered for personal development through associational officers leadership meetings, clinics, assemblies, conventions and conferences.

II. COUNSELING

- A. To counsel with church leaders **as requested** with reference to: (1) programs and procedures in their churches; (2) calling a pastor or other staff member; (3) actual or threatened breach of fellowship; (4) church objectives; (5) church policies.
- B. Counsel with church leaders **as requested** in pastorless church situations.
- C. Ministers and counsels with pastors, pastors' families, church staffs, and church staffs' families **as requested**.
- D. Counsel with individuals, **as requested**, who are called into church related vocations.

III. RELATING TO THE CHURCHES

- A. To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders to provide assistance in the church program and ministry.
- B. To visit churches on his own initiative for worship and Christian fellowship.

IV. DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION

- A. Supervise the publishing of "The Highlights", the associational newsletter.
- B. Prepare the Book of Reports for Annual Meeting.
- C. Make announcements at various associational meetings.
- D. Keep an up-to-date file in office on associational and denominational causes and activities.

V. ADMINISTRATIVE (In the Office)

- A. Personal correspondence pertinent to and incidental to his work.
- B. Interpretative and promotional mail pertinent to and incidental to his work.
- C. Telephoning pertinent to and incidental to his work.
- D. Office routine, which will include office hours to be set and announced by the Director of Missions.

POLICY STATEMENT

1. He shall inform the Missions Committee in advance of any absence from the field.
2. He may attend, at the Association's expense, the State and Southern Baptist Conventions and other assemblies and conferences pertaining specifically to his work within the limits provided in the Association's budget.
3. He may participate in the SBC Annuity Plan on the basis provided for in the Association's budget.
4. He may take 14 days annual vacation, the time to be determined at his own discretion.
5. A maximum of 4 weeks may be used for work outside the Association, such as schools of missions, church community surveys, enlargement campaigns, workshops, training sessions, etc.
6. A maximum of 4 weeks may be used for revivals, two weeks of which may be used outside of the Association, the honoraria to be kept by him.
7. He may supply in any one church in the pastor's absence no more than 4 times in a year. He may retain the honoraria received for such services.

8. He may have two weeks annual sick leave with pay. In case of an extended illness beyond two weeks, the extra time may be taken from the vacation or extra associational work. In case of an extreme emergency and the illness extends beyond the time considered, the Missions Committee shall determine an extension of sick leave.

9. The Missionary is not to expect any remuneration from the churches as he performs routine duties of his office except in aforesaid cases of revival meetings, and supplying in the absence of the pastor.

10. The Missionary shall have one full day per week.

THE MISSIONARY

I. QUALIFICATIONS

1. One who has had a genuine conversion experience, believing in the Bible as the inspired work of God.

2. One who is emotionally, physically, and socially capable of working with all peoples regardless of age, economic status, or educational level.

3. One who is committed to the basic Baptist principles.

4. One who has knowledge and understanding of local, state, and Southern Baptist mission programming and can promote such programs.

5. One who is a college graduate (preferable Baptist).

6. One who has a B. D. Degree or its equivalent from a seminary (preferably Southern Baptist).

7. One who has been pastor, or on the staff, or a church at least three years, or who has equivalent experience in denominational or promotional work.

8. One who has leadership qualities to administer, and counsel with church leaders.

9. One who can evaluate effectiveness as well as ineffectiveness of a program and delete or expand programs as the need demands.

**The job description and qualifications for the Association Missionary of the Tar River Baptist Association were adopted by the Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association in its regular meeting on June 27, 1967.

**REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD MEETING OF
THE BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION OF NORTH CAROLINA
October 11, 12, 1977**

I was elected to the General Board by the Executive Committee of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention, July 12, 1977 when Mr. Frank Reid resigned.

There has been only 1 General Board meeting, Tuesday and Wednesday, October 11 and 12 at the Caraway Conference Center.

There were several items presented to the General Board on Tuesday night: Mr. Earl J. McGrath, employed by the Lilly Endowment Fund, presented a report "Church and College: A Vital Partnership" a study of the 49 Baptist Colleges and Universities in the United States. The study was designed to allow each college measure its own problems and successes.

Roy Smith, the newly elected Associate General Secretary Treasurer, was presented to the General Board and he shared four reasons for his optimism for Baptists in North Carolina. He spoke of: (1) the Growing Spiritual Awakening; (2) Laymen are asking, "What can I do, NOW?"; (3) a growing contagious "good dissatisfaction"; and, (4) his gratitude for the leadership in the State Baptist Convention.

The budget was presented by layman, Raiford Troutman, and voted and approved on Wednesday morning. The total State Convention budget is \$14,750,000.00.

Richard Smith, business office director, gave the financial statement and reported that the State Mission Offering, as of October 7, 1977, was \$648,335.50. He had already paid off several notes and was hoping to pay off some more very soon. Each time that an additional \$100,000.00 is in the checking account he pays this against a note.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

Because of a certain ruling by the Internal Revenue Service of the United States Government, a resolution was presented which took exception with the Internal Revenue's ruling that our colleges, Homes for the aging, Hospitals, Children's Homes and other institutions of caring were not religious but benevolent institutions. This ruling allows the government to decide what is and what is not religious and is one step toward government controlling religion.

The committee of nine gave its recommendation which allows the convention's Nominating Committee to suggest people as trustees, on committees from among the Baptist Churches with membership less than 400. This will be voted on in November.

The Commissions on Mission Support and Church Growth suggested several areas of possible support and Growth for us. We will be urged to support our Convention's Programs by doubling our Cooperative Program support by 1982 and twice again by the year 2000. We will be urged to enroll more in Sunday School and assist each other in doubling our witness and baptisms by 1982.

Dr. Cecil Ray, our General Secretary - Treasurer, spoke about Church Growth and Support through the message "Bold Mission Thrust." He wondered out loud, whether we trusted the State Convention to give \$27,000,000.00 by 1982? and then double again to \$54 million dollars and then double again to \$108 million dollars in 2000 a.d.? He reminded us that "we have the money. We have the concern. But do we have the trust?"

The General Board is encouraging every baptist church to have messengers at the State Baptist Convention in Charlotte November 14-16. Because of this resolve

to have over 6,000 messengers in attendance the Charlotte Collesium has been rented rather than the auditorium. A very special feature of the Convention will be the Commissioning Worship of Foreign Missionaries on Tuesday Night. I hope you will make plans to be present, if not make sure at least one messenger is there from your church.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

In 1976, the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention recommended a new **retirement program** which was approved by all the state Baptist Conventions. The new program called the Southern Baptist Retirement Program will go into effect January 1, 1978.

In North Carolina as of March 31, 1977, 2787 staff members of 2196 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program -- 2491 in the Family Benefit Section; 1275 in the Age Security Section and 240 in the Variable Benefit Section.

Detailed information will be presented to churches in the early fall with a Route 10 promotional theme, according to Darold H. Morgan, President of the Board.

The Board paid \$17,138,343 in benefits to 11,925 widows, retired or disabled members in 1976. During its 59 years of service, the Board has paid more than \$158 million in retirement and protection benefits.

A 13th check amounting to one month's income was mailed for the eleventh time to annuitants. The combined amount of this extra benefit came to \$830,525.

Most members benefit from a decision to increase the interest rate for figuring retirement benefits. Annuitants began receiving larger checks as of January 1, 1977.

For almost 45,000 members, the Board held in trust funds totaling \$472,218,669 for retirement benefits for the year ending 1976.

The Annuity Board also administers life, medical and disability insurance programs which reflected increases in membership.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Association has met two times since the Spring Session:

June 27, 1977

Thirty-nine representing twenty-two churches were present.

Rev. Donald Wagner reported on the trip to the Island of Bardadis by some of the men of the Pilot Church which was a volunteer mission project.

The Missions Committee reported Mr. Frank Reed who was our representative on the General Board of the State Convention had resigned since he was moving and Rev. Donald Wagner had been appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Reed.

Rev. Charles Burchette reported the Missions Committee adopted a plan that the Association invite four people to come for a Bible Study Conference with one session in the North and one in the South of the Association.

Rev. Charles Burchette in his report gave 4 points of Emphasis he and Mrs. Burchette have tried to work on in their work in the Association: (1) Evangelism, (2) Youth, (3) Bible Study, (4) Missions.

The Moderator expressed appreciation to all, this being his last Executive Committee Meeting as Moderator.

The Treasurer's Report showed on hand August 31, 1977 -- \$8,206.58.

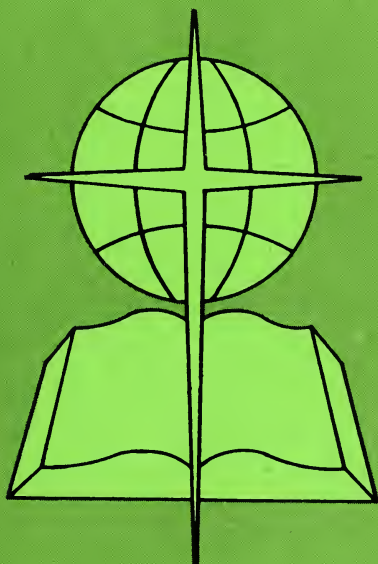

Constitution

ARTICLE I -- NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II -- PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

ARTICLE III -- MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet biannually in the Fall and Spring. The Fall session shall be primarily for business and the Spring session primarily for inspiration. The Annual Sermon shall be delivered during the Spring Season.

ARTICLE IV -- RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, and approval by a credentials committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator shall give the Messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V -- DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; messengers; give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter, these to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VI -- POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches, and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or

church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII -- OFFICERS

The officers of the association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer (with the privilege of combining the office of Clerk and Treasurer), Auditor, Historian, Trustees, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Stewardship Chairman, Chairman of the Social Services Committee, and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee. The Moderator, the Vice-Moderator, the Clerk, the Historian, the Trustees, the Chairman of the Social Services Committee and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence at the conclusion of the session. The Treasurer and the auditor shall be elected at the Fall Meeting and their terms of office shall commence on January 1. The Sunday School Director, the Church Training Director, the Woman's Missionary Union Director, the Brotherhood Director, the Music Director, the Chairman of Evangelism and the Stewardship Chairman are to be elected in the spring meeting of the association and their terms of office shall commence upon election. The above officers shall be elected annually. At such times as the Association shall elect a Director of Missions, he becomes an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII -- DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, to enforce the rules, to preserve order, and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also serve ex-officio chairman of the Executive Committee of the Association. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, to serve as Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and to serve as Chairman of the Missions Committee.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the body, and use all diligence in having same printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible, to mail the church clerks reminders by church letters forthcoming and to keep on hand the printed Minutes and other important documents belonging to the body. He shall also serve as ex-officio secretary of the Executive Committee.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse the monies contributed for the expenses of the body as authorized by the Executive Body.

E. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and report to the Association annually.

F. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and to report at the annual session of the Association.

G. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to respond, within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he

shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special Committees authorized by the Association.

H. It shall be the duty of the Associational Church Training Director to promote the interests of Church Training within the bonds of the Association and to make to the Association as annual report of the work accomplished.

I. It shall be the duty of the Associational Sunday School Director to promote the interests of the Sunday Schools within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

J. It shall be the duty of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union within the Director to promote the interests of the Woman's Missionary Union within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished. This officers election may be a confirmation of election by the Associational Womans Missionary Union.

K. It shall be the duty of the Associational Brotherhood Director to promote interests of the Brotherhood within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

L. The Association Music Director shall plan and direct the music for all meetings of the Association and its Executive Committee and shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music in the churches of the Association.

M. Three (3) trustees shall be elected from the membership of the Association to hold title of all property of the Association, to act under the direction of the Association through its Executive Committee to execute necessary legal documents, and to supervise the maintenance of all property belonging to the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive by purchase, gift or otherwise title to real and personal property and to see, convey or mortgage same for the use and benefit of said Association and it officers and agents upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of said Tar River Association.

The trustees shall also be responsible for and keep an undated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association. An additional copy of this inventory shall be filled with the Treasurer and at the Associational Office.

Trustees are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

N. It shall be the duty of the Associational Stewardship Chairman to both encourage and keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the stewardship of the total Christian life and witness. He shall make an annual progress report to the Association.

O. The Moderator shall appoint the Parliamentarian at each session of the Association and/or Executive Committee Meeting.

ARTICLE IX -- EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Associational Officers as setforth in Article VII, Director Missions, Moderator for past year, and Pastor and two members from each participating Church. Each church shall elect two members to serve on the Executive Committee prior to the regular Fall Annual Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Director Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee and does not have the power to vote.

C. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

1. The Executive Committee of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary and to define his duties.
2. To act for the Association between regular sessions of the body.

3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.
4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the Annual Budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.
6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Committee in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

ARTICLE X -- OTHER COMMITTEES

The following committees whose duties are prescribed below shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the Fall Meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the Fall Meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new committee will take office.

A. Nominating Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to nominate the members of the various committees and Chairmen and associational officers deemed necessary to facilitate the work of the Association. The Nominating Committee will be appointed hereafter by the Moderator of the Association. This Committee shall retain at least two of it's members from the preceding year.

B. Credentials Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to provide the Association with Authority for operation to determine the extent of the powers of the Association and to examine Articles of Faith and recommend the admission of new churches to the Association. It is the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association by badges as voting members of the Association.

D. Finance Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to propose a budget to the Executive Committee and to suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. The Committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. This Committee shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer shall serve as ex-officio member of this committee.

D. Resolutions Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to receive all resolutions presented to the Association.

This Committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting. Officers of the Association, etc.

E. Time, Place and Preacher Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational Meeting.

F. Missions Committee composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Chairman, Stewardship Chairman, and three (3) members at large, whose duty will be to assist the Director of Missions in the planning, promoting, and execution of Associational programs making recommendations to the Executive Committee.

G. Program Committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association whose duty shall be to receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Missions Committee Chairman, Director of Missions) draft and present the program, in printed form, for the sessions of the Association, which, upon the adoption by the Association,, shall become it's order of business. The host pastors shall be included in this Committee.

H. Constitutional Committee shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes.

I. Social Services Committee shall be composed of one representative each of the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Homes for Aging and Baptist Hospital whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of these institutions.

J. Christian Education Committee shall be composed of a Christian Literature Representative, a Christian Education Representative, and one member at large whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

ARTICLE XI -- ORDAINING COUNCIL

In order to preserve the Baptist position with reference to the divine call to the ministry, and to recognize the responsibility of a local church to the entire Baptist denomination, the Association shall elect annually an ordaining council that may act in an advisory capacity for churches seeking its assistance. In setting up this Council and in its work, the following things are to be noted:

A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership and the request from the church come to the Association through the moderator or the Association Office.

B. That the church in which the candidate holds membership elect to the Council three members, one of them the pastor, provided he is not the candidate for ordination.

C. That the Tar River Association elect six members to constitute a standing ordaining council, to serve with the three members appointed by the local church, one of which shall be designated chairman by the Moderator. These shall serve terms of three years, and shall be ineligible to succeed themselves.

D. That the Council then proceed in the usual Baptist method and policy for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

E. That we encourage insofar as it is practical public ordination services.

F. That the Tar River Association furnish the minister thus set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry by this Council with credentials signed by the Moderator and Clerk of the Association and by each member of the Council.

ARTICLE XII -- VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XIII -- AMENDMENTS

This Constitution or the By-Laws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment (s) will be presented to afternoon session and voted on no earlier than evening session.

ARTICLE XIV - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert Rules of Order.

BY-LAWS

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.
4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.
5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.
6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.
7. All resolutions must be stated in writing and handed to the Clerk.
8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.
9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.
10. Reports of Committees on Convention objects must be brief - that on Missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.
11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.
12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to:

13. The Clerk and Treasurer shall receive honorariums to be determined by the Executive Committee for their services as an expression of appreciation.
14. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

AFTERNOON SESSION

1. The Spring Meeting of the One Hundred and Forty Eighth Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator at 4:00 P.M.
2. Rev. Jerry Benfield led the congregation in singing "To God Be The Glory".

4. The new Associational Director of Missions was presented to the congregation.

9. Rev. Joe Allen presented the history of Rock Springs which was adopted.

10. Social Services reports included Homes For Aging by Rev. Ron Wildes, Baptist Hospital by Rev. Bruce Martin, Children's Homes by Rev. Winfred Porter, all reports were adopted.

11. Rev. Winfred Porter introduced Mr. Roger Williams of the Baptist Children's Homes, who brought a message on Children's Homes which began in 1885 and served all areas of the State. He announced area conferences, September 28 would be at Kennedy Home. He talked of cases in which care was given to children in need.

12. Rev. Jerry Benfield led the congregation in singing "Blessed Assurance".

13. Business Session included no old business. Mrs. Nan Jones spoke on the Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest to be held later to educate leaders in the Association in order that they might lead in educating leaders in the churches.

14. Mrs. Nan Jones presented the Nominating Committee report as printed in the Book of Reports which was adopted.

15. Mrs. Nan Jones presented the Treasurer's report in the absence of Mr. Maylon J. Frazier, the report was adopted as printed.

16. Mrs. Nan Jones presented the Auditor's report in the absence of Mr. Allen Shearin, the report was adopted as printed.

17. Mr. J. Philip Murray presented the Executive Committee report in the absence of Mrs. Willis R. Warren. The report was adopted as printed in the Book of Reports.

18. Rev. Donald Wagner presented the Search Committee report which was adopted. He introduced Dr. W.R. McCullom, New Director who spoke to this report.

19. Mrs. Nan Jones presented the Trustee's report in the absence of Mr. Milton Shearin as printed. Report was adopted.

20. Mrs. Nan Jones presented the Missions Committee report in the absence of Mr. Larry Strickland. Report was adopted as printed.

21. Rev. Kenneth Batts announced the Vacation Bible School Clinic to be next Monday at 7:00 P.M.

22. Worship period opened with Rev. Jerry Benfield leading in singing "Work For The Night Is Coming".

23. Rev. Ralph Warren read scripture from Ephesians and led in prayer.

24. The new State Director of Stewardship, Nan Williams, introduced Mr. Talmadge Williams who would speak after special music.

25. Special music "It Took A Miracle" by Rev. Joe and Reba Allen.

26. Message by Mr. Talmadge Williams.

27. Prayer of Thanksgiving before the meal led by Mr. Donald Meyers.

EVENING SESSION

28. Meeting called to order at 7:30 P.M.

29. Rev. Jerry Benfield led in singing "Hark The Voice of Jesus Calling".

30. Rev. Joe Allen read scripture and led in prayer.

31. Mr. Lloyd Frazier presented the History of Harris Chapel which was adopted.

32. Mr. Guilford Bufkin gave the Credentials Committee report showing that 33 churches were represented, with 124 messengers, 20 alternates, 7 visitors, 5 officers, 20 Pastors, giving a total of 176 present.

33. Mr. Phillip Murray gave the Resolutions Committee report which was adopted.

HISTORY OF HARRIS CHAPEL BAPTIST CHURCH

Eight miles east of Wake Forest, North Carolina, near Harris Crossroads, stands one of the most outstanding rural churches in North Carolina. This white frame structure is known as Harris Chapel Baptist Church.

The beginning of this Baptist Church dates back to about 1884 or 1885 when a small Sunday School was organized in Math Rock school building, located a short distance from where the church now stands. At first this group consisted of Baptists, Methodists, and Congregational Christians meeting together for Sunday School each Sunday morning.

At the end of one year the Baptists, few in number, organized a Sunday School and met in the afternoon in the same building, leaving the morning for other denominations. Gideon Minga was chosen the first Superintendent. The average attendance was about 35.

This small group of Christians had the pioneer vision for more than a Sunday School. In 1888, Supt. Minga learned that the Rev. Marion E. Pernell of Franklinton, North Carolina, who was active and successful in working with new churches, could be secured to preach once a month to the Baptist congregation at Math Rock. These few members contributed a salary of approximately \$5.00 per month but as of yet there was no church organization. Worship services were held in the schoolhouse monthly for about one year.

In the Summer of 1888 plans were made for a revival meeting. It was decided to leave the school building and build a bush arbor with the view in mind of building a church later. The men built the arbor near the present site of the church.

A.J.P. Harris had promised to give the necessary land if a church should be built. Pastor Pernell was on hand with a two-horse wagon and helped vigorously with the labor, the construction of the arbor and the erection of the church building.

Dr. W. R. Cullom, a young preacher at Wake Forest, came to preach in the first revival meeting while building the bush arbor.

Interest in building a church began to grow after this meeting. The church was not organized until early Spring of 1890. The new church was a one room building which stood for three years unfinished.

Rev. Pernell conducted the first revival in the new church in August of 1890. There were 36 members for Sunday School and 12 Charter members, contributions amounting to \$22.58 for the year. For nine years the church grew slowly under the faithful leadership of Rev. Pernell.

In the year of 1900, a new pastor was called, Rev. W. H. Dodd, and a new Sunday School Superintendent, A. J. Frazier, took office the same year.

The church membership had grown to 65 and Sunday School to 77. The financial

records for the end of the year showed \$83.43 for local expenses and \$11.30 given to missions. Four of these first ten years nothing was given to missions.

At the end of the next decade, in 1910, records showed a continuous growth with church membership to 104 and Sunday School to 104. Total contributions were \$129.88. Local expenses \$102.00 and given to missions \$27.88. Sixty-six were baptized during this ten year period. Rev. A.A. Pippin served as pastor for seven of these years.

At the close of the third decade Rev. J. B. Davis was serving in his second year as pastor. Sunday School membership was 72. It had dropped some, but church membership had grown to 135 the largest in its history. The most outstanding thing in this period was the financial record of \$19.20.

In the year of 1918 with 129 members, local expenses were \$159.50 and \$64.16 for missions. Whereas, in the year 1920 with 135 members, local expenses were \$268.55. Gifts to missions \$243.47 and there were 35 baptisms during this decade.

In the year of 1921 Rev. Charles B. Howard began his ministry at Harris Chapel. The church has shown its greatest development under his great and capable leadership.

At the close of 1930 there were 165 members of the Sunday School, 250 church members. In the midst of the great depression it was natural to find the church budget smaller. Local expenses \$600.00 and missions \$100.00.

During prosperous years from 1924-27, our total budget averaged \$1,500. per annum. There were 115 baptized from 1920 to 1930.

The records for the decade ending 1940 showed the greatest number of baptisms of any previous 10 year period, total 131. At the close of this year Sunday School membership was 240 and 348 church members. Local expenses \$12,581.47 and \$701.28 was given to missions.

The past several years have been the most difficult because of Mr. Howard's declining health. In spite of all this the 1948 records were excellent. Church members enrolled was 314 and Sunday School 247 members. Training Union had an enrollment of 192. The financial records were above those of the average rural church.

OUTSTANDING MEN IN THE LIFE OF THE CHURCH

The church was named for Mr. A. J. P. Harris, who gave the church the land and a portion of the building material for the first church.

After founding a little struggling church with only nine charter members, he faithfully shepherded the flock for eleven years. We are told that he dropped dead by the horse he was hitching to a buggy to come to the little church he loved so well.

A consecrated layman, Harrod Frazier, served as the Sunday School Superintendent from 1914-1933. Mr. Frazier was a faithful servant of the Lord. One lady of the community says of him, "He was the best man I have ever seen and loved by all."

The present pastor, Mr. Charles B. Howard, is the best loved pastor Harris Chapel has ever had. Few men ever lived who have touched the lives of all groups of people, inspiring them to greater things for God, through his daily walk with God. He has given guidance, counsel and advice to thousands. It is a source of encouragement just to be in his presence.

The church stood until the middle of the twenties, a one-room wood building and later remodeled to include eight Sunday School rooms. Church furniture was similar to that of the average church. The heating system was two big oil circulators. They have now a building fund of around \$5,000.

During most part of 1946 and 1947, Jack Wilder served as Mr. Howard's assistant and preached for almost a year while he was resting from an illness. "Eternity only can reveal how much we owe to this pioneer for the Lord, who erected a bush arbor to preach the word." And to Charles B. Howard for

leading his people to feel the need of being true Missionary Baptists. The church asked the Mission Board to assign a missionary to them for support.

Beginning January 1, 1946, as a memorial to Capt. Clifford Layton, our church began to support a full time American Southern Baptist Missionary in China.

Mrs. P. W. Hamlett of Morganton, North Carolina, was assigned. Following the death of her husband on January 3, 1947, she asked to be sent back to the work in China which she and Brother Hamlett had loved and served so long.

A survey of the activities of Harris Chapel Church would not be completed without mention of the work of Mrs. "X".

She has been one of the most outstanding workers in the church in all its fine history. It is due to the untiring efforts of workers like this lady that the church has gone forward so rapidly even without a resident pastor. Mrs. "X" has given all her time for the past five years to her church. She is a organizer, leader, and one of the best Sunday School teachers in the country. The joy in serving was the only pay she desired. So humble and modest she ask that her name not be used, but she will long be a memorial to the Harris Chapel Church.

During Rev. Jack Wilder's ministry at Harris Chapel he was our leader and we were his followers. A choir loft was added to the right side of the pulpit on the West side.

The church voted to build a recreational building on the West side of the church. Mr. Wilder was assisting Mr. Howard at that time due to his illness. Mr. Wilder, with the members, worked hard and long hours erecting a log building. The logs were given by the people as were other materials. We used it for two Sunday School rooms as well as indoor social and recreation. Those logs hovered around many prayer meetings. The Lord's presence was always near.

Several years passed, we worked hard on our Building Fund. We still didn't have enough money to pay down on a new brick building. The deacons had a meeting and decided to ask the members to give a certain amount in order to get the foundation started.

Central Carolina Bank in Wake Forest, N.C., financed the loan. Some members had their money but some went to Mr. Willie Satterwhite at Central Carolina Bank and got a loan to help start the church. We paid off the debt in 1976 in the Fall and New Year's Eve night we had a Note Burning Ceremony. The building alone was \$119,800. with all furnishing approximately \$150,000. Furnishings were given as memorials.

During the pastorate of Rev. Shannon Scott, 1972-78, much was accomplished. He was a great servant of God and faithful to his church. The church voted to have a tennis court and buy a van bus for the young people. Not forgetting the Senior Citizens, they meet once a month for a meal at church and took trips for recreation. They are a great bunch and enjoyed every minute of the social affairs.

We give the Lord all the credit and thanks.

HISTORY OF BETHLEHEM BAPTIST CHURCH

On October 19, 1895 under the leadership of Rev. M. R. Purnell and Rev. E.J. Harrell, deacons, J. A. Clifton, C. Hobgood, C. G. Mitchell and W.W. Perry met and constituted a Missionary Baptist Church. The church was to be named Bethlehem Baptist Church, and located in Franklin County near Riley Cross Roads, better known as "The County Line". A covenant and articles of Faith were adopted and 15 members were received. Miss Donie Mitchell was first converted member.

Rev. M.R. Purnell was called as preacher for 1896 at a salary of \$25.00 a year. Meetings were held first Sunday of month with the business meetings held on the Saturday before. Meetings were held in a small building on land joining that on which the Riley Academy was located.

A building committee consisting of E. G. Conyers, C. E. Richards and H. M. Norwood went to work and in 1897, Mr. J. R. Harris was given contract for \$36.00 to construct a 32' x 40' building on land donated by Mr. W.W. Perry. On November 5, 1898, members held their first service in their new house of worship with the pastor, Rev. G.W. Coppedge preaching from Philippians 4:6, "Let your request be known to God."

The church was a member of the Central Association with preachers called each year. From 1899-1916 these included J. D. Morris, C.G. Lowe, T.C. Singleton, Z. W. Wheless, G. P. Harrell and C.T. Plybon. During these years separate rolls were kept for men and women. At varying times there were 70 women and 60 men on roll. Music was furnished by the pump organ, one of which was donated by Mrs. Frankie G. Richards. Committees were often formed to see members about their "Christian Walk". Each member was asked to contribute to missions and these were given each month as to how much was received from each person.

In 1910, land was purchased for the church cemetery. Deacons W.T. Gay, C.E. Richards and J. W. Clements were appointed trustees of the church.

In 1929 with Rev. Charles B. Howard as pastor, Sunday School offices were set up and made part of the church. New Sunday School rooms were added. Lumber for these was donated by C.E. Richards and he spent last 3 weeks of his life in dedication to completing this work. Rev. A. D. Parrish served from 1934-1937. Rev. William B. Cone was pastor from 1939-1942. Rev. Alfred F. Gibson was ordained as minister in 1942, the first to be ordained in the church.

In 1944 with Rev. J. L. Atkins, pastor, the Central Association combined with Raleigh Association with the vote of the people. In this time period and some years before, new deacons were added, Thurman Johnson, H.H. Rhodes, F.A. Baker, D.M. Pearce, J.E. Gay, H.J. Richards, Bobby Richards and M.L. Fowler.

1951-1953, repair work was done on Sunday School rooms and new seats purchased through individual pledges. A new electric organ was purchased. Vacation Bible School was organized as well as Baptist Training Union. An additional parcel of land was added to the cemetery.

From 1956-1964, four pastors served, Rev. Ellis Hollon, Wendell Page, Ray Walker and David Pope. Rev. Pope became first resident pastor of the community, moving his mobile home onto the church grounds. More deacons were ordained, Bob Richards, Lawrence Rogers, John Baker Arnold and Carlton Edwards. Sunday School growth and need for more space set off a long term building program. Plans for 6 new Sunday School rooms, with basement were adopted as well as remodeling sanctuary. A new choir loft and auditorium was completed in 1961 and interior of church painted.

New organ was purchased in 1962 and a piano donated in 1963 by Mr. and Mrs. Eric Pearce.

In 1964 forced air heat was installed in sanctuary. Land was donated for parsonage by Mr. and Mrs. Howard Phillips.

Rev. Jerry Mullinax was called as pastor in 1965 and plans moved ahead for construction of the parsonage. Members donated time, money, materials and labor and with this strong dedication it was completed for a cost of approximately \$14,000. Thurman Johnson dedicated much of his time toward this project before his death in 1966. A dedication service was held on July 16, 1967 by Rev. Mullinax.

Rev. Thomas J. Lomax served 1967-72. In 1968 the church changed from Raleigh Association to Tar River Association. On October 11, 1972 the church suffered a great loss as the Lord called one of his more dedicated servants to be with him. Mr. H. T. Rogers, long time deacon, treasurer and inspiration to many is still missed by our congregation. Bobby Richards and Carlton Edwards have served as treasurer and managed the building funds for many years. Their handling of the finances is to be commended, in the light of what was accomplished through their efforts.

The parsonage debt was paid off in 1972 and attention centered again on the church building. Air conditioning was installed in new and old part, awnings and storm windows and doors installed and repair work on roof. The basement Fellowship Hall was furnished with range, sink, refrigerator and a piano was given by Cordell Richards for use there. Carpet was installed.

1975-76 brought desire for beautifying sanctuary. New carpet was installed, walls repainted and church pews covered. New furniture for vestibule was given by Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Gay.

We called Rev. Kenneth Batts, our present pastor, in May 1977. He was ordained November 6, 1977 in Surf City, N.C. In October 1977, heat pump was installed in parsonage and additional insulation.

This history of our church building, with its renovations over years cannot tell the real history of our church. We cannot record on paper the lives of dedicated men and women of God who since 1895 have struggled with such love to keep a church going forward. And as we continue to make future history - we can rely on these same words from Philippians. "Let your request be known to God."

HISTORY OF ROCK SPRING BAPTIST CHURCH

"We, the undersigned members of Rock Spring Church, do covenant and agree that we will, to the best of our ability, support and sustain this, the Baptist Church of Christ, upon principles founded upon the Holy Word of God.

Thus began the Rock Spring Baptist church on April 26, 1874, under a bush arbor. Rock Spring is located in Franklin County, seven miles south of Louisburg on Highway 39.

From this group of thirteen charter members, the membership increased to sixty-one in the first year. A. J. Underhill and John Odom were the first deacons.

On January 31, 1874, Wilson T. Strickland and wife, Marilda, had given two and three-eighths acres of land and in 1876 a building was erected just south of the present building. Trustees were Wilson T. Strickland, Bryant Wilder, A.J. Underhill, and John H. Odom.

On April 7, 1894, Mr. M. T. Howell and wife, Millie Ann, gave an acre of land adjoining the original plot and the auditorium of the present building was begun and was in use by 1897.

In May, 1923, a building committee was appointed to formulate plans for Sunday School rooms. That committee was composed of D.V. Cheaves, John B. Wilder, W. Seba Strickland, Frank M. Baker, and Melvin C. Wilder. In 1926 these rooms were in use.

In August, 1952, Arthur T. Howell and wife gave one-half acre of land for the purpose of building a parsonage and in June, 1953, the parsonage was occupied by its first residents, Rev. and Mrs. C.L. Holland and son, Steve. This building was considerably enlarged in 1960.

In November, 1961, the church began an addition at the rear of the sanctuary which included class rooms, choir loft, rest rooms, and a large basement. Work toward the completion and refinement of this project has continued at various times since.

On January 17, 1966, W. Clyde Privette and wife deeded to Rock Spring Baptist Church 0.2 acres of land. Making total acreage for the church 4.3 acres.

Within the last decade much has been done to make the church building more attractive, more useful, and more comfortable including new paint inside and out, new pulpit furniture and pews, and air conditioning for the sanctuary. New walls and carpeting for certain areas has been provided, and a nursery has been established and furnished. This year \$3,500 has been expended for repairs and additions. An electric Wurlitzer organ was purchased in 1971.

April, 1974, our one hundredth Anniversary - on Sunday the 28th, we held a Special Service. A former pastor, Rev. Clifford Holland, was guest speaker, along with Rev. Bert Vaughn. After a wonderful message from the former pastor, a most enjoyable meal was served. Those attending numbered about 200. Members, former members, and friends, some as far away as Robbinsville, N.C. and Richmond, Virginia and fellowship was enjoyed by all.

Also, in 1974, a church sign was erected at the entrance of the driveway and the parsonage was repainted.

In 1975, the basement was completed including a kitchen. The metal roof of the church and the Sunday School rooms which had lasted 50 years were replaced. Also, the Sanctuary was painted and the ceiling lowered.

1976, another year for repairs and replacements. The space heaters in the parsonage were replaced with central heat and air conditioning. Also chandeliers were installed in the Sanctuary, donated by Mr. and Mrs. Victor Stallings.

1977, the parsonage was painted inside and carpet installed. Central heat was installed in the basement of the church.

Much of our construction has been accomplished with substantial saving by the giving of time, talent, and materials by members and friends of the church.

The progress of the church has been due, in large measure, to able and consecrated pastors beginning with Rev. Marion R. Pernell and continuing with A. T. Nowell, W.C. Nowell, J.R. Jones, P.H. Pernell, J.H. Booth, W.H. Edwards, George W. May, W.E. Woodruff, A.A. Pippin, Forrest Smith,

H.H. Mashburn, E.D. Poe, L.W. Swope, Max Stamps, Wallace Hartsell, W.M. Gilmore, T.D. Collins, J.C. McGregor, D.M. Clemmons, H.L. Arnold, C.M. Rollins, C.E. Crawford, P.P. Hartsell, William Cone, R.E. Moore, W.P. Childers, Eugene E. Poston, Jimmie L. Atkins, Aaron C. Phipps, Maurice W. Grissom, Clifford L. Holland, Ellis W. Hollon, Roy Walker, Tommy E. Lolley, Joseph E. Buck, Paul C. Millwood, Bert Vaughn, Max Smith and Joseph Allen.

Rock Spring, with a small membership within a five-mile radius of six other churches, anticipates no phenomenal growth in membership; but a dedicated and Spirit-led membership can, we believe, render genuine service in the cause of Christ.

We make no claim to a perfect record, but reflecting on a small congregation with varying degrees of talent and commitment and working with 40 different pastors, we may well do as St. Paul did at a certain point as he traveled the Appian Way to Rome, "thank God and take courage."

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association has met four times since our Fall meeting.

December 12, 1977 at Duke Memorial with 58 present representing 28 churches.

The Missions Committee offered a recommendation "that Mrs. Donald (Nan) Jones be Interim Missionary until a Director of Missions is called at \$5.00 per trip and \$5.00 per hour for work done". A motion to accept the recommendation was passed. Mrs. Jones announced she would be at the office on Mondays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and if anyone needed her to contact her and she would go when needed.

Rev. Donald Wagner made a motion "that the Trustees of Our Association be empowered; to have the Association pastorium painted inside and outside; that the draperies in the Associational Directors office be repaired or replaced; that the painting of the inside await the call of a Director of Missions so that he can make suggestions about the decor; and, that the expenses of these items be taken from unexpended funds in the Associational treasury". Motion was adopted.

Mrs. Nan Jones presented the need to install a linen closet in the Association pastorium, stating the space was already there, the need was to add shelves and install a door. Motion was passed to install the linen closet.

Rev. Charles Burchette informed the Executive Committee they had bought a new stove and had it delivered to the pastorium the day before. Mrs. Burchette wanted to take the stove they were using with them, which was purchased by the Association three years ago. She had broken off small spot of enamel. An amended motion was passed that Mrs. Burchette be given the prerogative to choose the stove she wants". Rev. Shannon Scott read his resignation as Associational Sunday School Director and member of Missions Committee, effective January 8, 1978. He was leaving the Association to pastor Mount Vernon Baptist Church in the Raleigh Association. Accepted.

Mr. Maylon J. Frazier presented his Treasurer's report showing on hand with savings included \$9,126.59.

Mrs. Nan Jones reported the W.M.U. had a very successful Prayer Retreat at Red Bud Church and following honored Rev. and Mrs. Burchette with a reception.

Rev. Charles Burchette presented his printed report of activities during October, November and December. He said he will be active as long as he has

health. He expressed thanks for "all you have let us do", during the seven years and two months they have been with Tar River Association.

Rev. A.S. Tomlinson ask that we give a standing ovation in thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Burchette.

February 5, 1978 a called meeting at Duke Memorial with 71 present representing 33 churches. Everyone went by the pastorium first to see the needs of the house.

Rev. Lyman Wilson, moderator, appointed Rev. Donald Wagner as parliamentary for the business session.

Mr. Richard Morgan, spokesman for the Search Committee for an Associational Missions Director offered a recommendation from the Committee that Rev. Marshall M. Vaughn be called as Associational Missionary and moved the recommendation be adopted. Rev. Ron Wiles seconded. A Biographical Sketch on Mr. Vaughn had been handed to each one. A period of discussion revealed the recommendation was unanimous with the Search Committee and Mr. Vaughn could come to the Association the first week in April. He had notified the committee he could not be present today because of sickness in his wife's family.

A standing vote was taken and the motion passed with 5 opposing.

The need to carpet the floors at the pastorium was presented. This was not listed in the motion passed at the December meetings on things the Trustees were empowered to do and so a motion was passed to reconsider the motion passed at the last meeting.

Rev. Merlin Boone then made a motion to redecorate the pastorium and carpet the floors. The motion passed, the job to be done by the Trustees.

A motion was passed that we pay all moving expenses of the new Missionary.

March 27, 1978 regular meeting at Duke Memorial with 53 present from 24 churches. Mr. Larry Strickland was moderator.

Mr. Richard Morgan announced next Sunday, April 2, had been set for a called meeting for the purpose of being introduced to and voting on a person to be recommended as Associational Missions Director by the Committee. The person who was voted on did not accept. The meeting would be at Maple Springs Church with a reception from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. where you could meet the person and meet to take a vote at 3:45 p.m.

Rev. Winfred Porter made a motion "that the Missions Committee meet with the clerk to see if the minutes can be printed earlier." Passed.

Rev. Ken Batts brought a Vacation Bible School report emphasizing the Associational Clinic to be held April 24 at Cedar Rock at 7 o'clock. He had all the teachers except one present to speak and encourage a good attendance.

The W.M.U. Associational Meeting was announced.

April 2, 1978 at Maple Springs Church at 3:45 p.m. There were 75 present from 34 churches.

Mr. Richard Morgan spoke for the committee to secure a missionary. He handed out and went through the information sheet on the person and made a motion "that we call Dr. William Ray McCollum as Director of Missions". Mr. D.C. Phillips seconded and in discussion it was reported that if called Mr. McCollum would resign April 16 and be available here June 15. He had signed a note saying he would if called to come as missionary.

Rev. Larry Boswell was called upon to lead in prayer before the vote was taken. A standing vote was taken with no opposition. Mr. Richard Morgan made a motion that we pay the moving expenses of the new missionary from Island Creek. Motion passed.

Mrs. Nan Jones reported work at missionary's home was completed except for drapes and carpet.

A motion was passed to give standing vote of appreciation to Mrs. Jones for the job she has done.

Mrs. Jones reported they had worked hard on the program for the Association and ask every one to be there April 17. She also announced the W.M.U. Meeting at Castalia, April 3.

The new missionary was called in and spoke briefly to the group.

1. The 148th Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator at 4:00 P.M.

37. The Credentials Committee report by Mr. Guilford Bufkin was adopted. The report showed Messengers present 154, Alternates 15, Pastors 27, Officers 14, Guests 3, making total of 213 present.

38. Mr. Maylon J. Frazier presented the printed Treasurer's report which was adopted.

39. The Trustees had no report.

40. Mrs. Willis R. Warren presented the printed report in the Book of Reports which was adopted.

41. Mrs. Florine Braswell presented the Stewardship report including the Proposed Budget which was adopted.

42. Mr. Abrams with Gardner Webb College brought a Christian Education report.

43. Rev. Jerry Benfield led in the singing of "I Love To Tell The Story".

44. Mr. Earl Oldham brought special music "How Great My God".

45. The congregation learned it was the birthday of the Moderator Rev. Lyman Wilson.

46. The Message on "Discipleship" was brought by Rev. Bob Shepherd of Sanford First Baptist Church. His scripture was Matthew 10:24-38.

47. Benediction was led by Rev. Shelby Stevens and the meeting adjourned.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF LOUISBURG BAPTIST CHURCH

The father of the Louisburg Baptist Church was a man of remarkable talents with which he pursued his high calling. Dr. Samuel Wait came to North Carolina in 1827. After leading in the creation of the North Carolina Baptist Convention, the establishment of the **Biblical Recorder**, and becoming the first President of Wake Forest College in 1836, he drew a group of Baptist people together in the community of Louisburg to form a church. He was chairman

of the organizing council and later was the first pastor of the Louisburg Baptist Church.

The Tar River Association, organized in 1830, received the Louisburg Church in the fall of 1836 during the session meeting at the Shiloh Church in Franklin County.

Minutes of business conferences reveal the struggles of the young church. One type of problem was that of discipline. Committees to investigate people who had not attended meetings were frequently appointed. Members were "excommunicated" from the church for moral deviation, also. Cases of immorality between slaves belonging to different families came before the church. Later, charges against Negro members were referred to the "colored deacons." Lists of members reveal that the "black roll" was much longer than the "white roll."

At a meeting held in the Presbyterian Church on the third Sabbath of June 1849 (17th) the church voted to organize a Sabbath School. Another notable name in the records of the church was that of Guilford Lewis, a local merchant. His financial support, time-consuming exertions and patient leadership held the Church together through the years. First Sabbath School superintendent, "the church granted Brother G. Lewis the liberty of exercising his gifts publicly and requested the clerk to prepare a certificate to that effect for Brother Lewis" upon the resignation of Pastor R. I. Divine, November 18, 1854.

The war of 1860-65 resulted in the withdrawal of the white members of the church and the property on which the First Baptist Church of Louisburg now stands was old to the black members.

In 1869 Captain C. M. Cooke moved to Louisburg. Very soon he began to call the Baptists together. Dr. J. L. Carroll, Pastor of the Maple Springs Church, led in the re-organization of the Louisburg Baptist Church. Among the names of the 19th century Judge Charles M. Cooke stands out among those known as prominently significant in the church. On one occasion he was personally attacked in the church. He is quoted as saying, making no defense against the charges, "Brethren, the church can get along without me, but I cannot get along without the church."

The Church building was that one now on Sunset Avenue being used as an apartment house. On January 15, 1900 a deed was made conveying the present property on the corner of N. Main and Middle Streets from the Louisburg Presbyterian Church to the Louisburg Baptist Church. The Rev. Forrest Smith, pastor from 1898-1902, worked with the leadership of the church toward the construction of the present sanctuary which was completed during the ministry of the Rev. H. H. Mashburn (1902-1906). In April 1904, the building was formally dedicated. In succeeding years, the ground under the building was excavated and came into use for the growing needs of the church, to be made into its present form in 1948. The present sanctuary was renovated in 1978.

In 1928-29 the educational space around the southeast corner of the building was erected, largely through the influence, exertion and provisions of Mr. George Cooper, supported by the pastor, the Rev. Mr. A. Fleishman. The educational building east of the sanctuary was erected 1960-61 and the note was retired February 2, 1975.

In 1898, inspired by Mrs. Forrest Smith, wife of the Pastor, the ladies of the church formed the Woman's Missionary Society which is now a major influence in the life of the church. The Brotherhood was organized in 1955 with Mr. W.J. Cooper, Jr. the first president.

The first recorded Constitution and By-laws of the church were adopted April 14, 1855. The Constitution revised, the Covenant and a roll of the membership was published in a manual for the Louisburg Baptist Church in

1889. On April 21, 1963, the present Constitution, prepared by a committee led by Mr. G. M. Beam, Jr., became the instrument under which the church now operates. This Constitution incorporated many improvements in the business structure begun in the ministry of Dr. John Simons (1936-38) and refined and implemented during the ministry of Dr. A. Paul Bagby (1938-45). The Advisory Board, the business body of the church, includes 12 men and 12 women deacons, officers of the major church organizations and constitutional committee chairmen.

Since organization, the church has been a member of the Tar River Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. Since 1960 this church has been a member of the North Carolina Council of Churches. Since organization, a cordial relationship with churches of other denominations has existed. It was in the building of the Presbyterian Church that the meeting was held establishing the first Baptist "Sabbath Sunday," June 1849. In July 1849, a union meeting of Methodists and Baptists in the Methodist Church celebrated the fourth of July. Early in the twentieth century the practice of excluding non-Baptists from the Lord's Table was interrupted and has been discontinued since 1946. Cooperation and friendly relations with Christians of other denominations without denying our Baptist heritage continues.

Although the church has been handicapped as so many young men and women who grew up here have found their life work elsewhere, other families have moved to Louisburg. Together with those who have remained in the town these have provided able leadership and support. The present roll of the church includes 576 persons. Mrs. Richard Southerland is the church secretary, incorporating in her office the constitutional functions of church clerk and financial secretary, also. Rev. Aubrey S. Tomlinson became Pastor of the church in February 1946 and served faithfully and well until his retirement in 1972. The Rev. Bill R. Almond, Jr. has been Pastor of the church since March 1972.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF MAPLE SPRINGS BAPTIST CHURCH

Our church was organized at a summer protracted meeting July 15, 1773, with Elder Barrow from the Isle of Wright, Virginia, preaching under brush arbor close to a spring and a large maple tree. Thus the name, Maple Springs.

The year 1775 saw a log building erected on land owned by Jeremiah Perry. The congregation voted July 27, 1779 to build a frame structure under the direction of their pastor, Rev. William Lancaster.

The church left the Kehukey Baptist Association in 1830 to become a charter member of the Tar River Baptist Association. They also at this time started the church school which is now our Sunday School.

The church building was remodeled in 1858. The Ladies' Society was organized and many mission duties were initiated during this time.

The latter part of 1878, Rev. George Duke started his 36 years of ministry at this church. He has many relatives who are members at Maple Springs now. After the death of Rev. Duke, the church had many of what was known as "Wake Forest boys".

In 1935, the church had Vacation Bible School and Baptist Young People's Union. In 1937, the light came--electric. In 1938, the church felt it needed a woman's voice in governing matters--quite a change from the beginning when women were not allowed any voice in church business.

On January 24, 1943, the church voted to start building Sunday School rooms. By the end of 1947, seven Sunday School rooms and brick veneer was added to the church. A porch with columns was also added.

In 1959, an organ and sanctuary carpet were installed. In 1960, the nursery furniture was constructed and installed. The educational building was dedicated in 1969 in memory of Annie Fleming and Clyde Harris. Air conditioning was installed in the main building at this time.

In 1971, the pastor's study in the educational building was finished. In 1978, an anonymous donor presented the church with a set of chimes. They were installed and are used every week.

During the history of Maple Springs Baptist Church, there have been a total of 40 pastors who served this church. In the course of her history, she has helped organize 6 churches. Today, Maple Springs Church has 261 members. The present pastor is Rev. Michael D. Brooks.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association has met two times since the Spring Session, both meetings held at Duke Memorial Church.

June 19, 1978 There were 47 present representing 22 churches. Included in the reports was the treasurer's report showing a balance on hand May 31 of \$9,488.54, checking and savings accounts.

The trustees reported the work on the missionary's home was completed.

The Missions Committee offered three recommendations:

- 1) That the Key Leadership Conference be a substitute for Bold Mission Thrust, to be held July 17 and 18 with Cedar Rock and Pilot churches from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. (Adopted).
- 2) That the missionary be allowed to purchase a mailing permit. (Adopted).
- 3) To increase insurance on the pastorium. A motion was made that the pastorium be insured for \$60,000.00 plus replacement value of contents. Motion passed.

Rev. Bruce O. Martin reminded us that our adopted budget asked that we give 3% of our church budget to the Association.

Mr. Larry Strickland reminded us that the budget is in need of attention to meet the near \$24,000.00 budget.

September 25, 1978 Sixty-four were present representing 29 churches. The treasurer's report showed balance on hand 8-31-78 was \$9,132.10, checking and savings.

Mr. Jesse Murphrey reported 145 from 25 churches attended the Pastor-Deacon supper. He encouraged mission activities. A group from Pilot Church would be going to Buxton or Swansboro and he invited others to participate.

Mrs. Halcy Davis reported four Associational W.M.U. officers attended Mundo Vista W.M.U. clinic and she attended the Baptist State Convention. She reported two churches were without W.M.U. organizations and one other drop out.

The proposed budget from the Finance Committee for 1979 was adopted to be presented to the Association.

A motion was passed to request \$2,400.00 support from the State Convention for the coming year.

A recommendation from the trustees was adopted, to put a top on the pastorium of black fiberglass with 20-year guarantee.

The Louisburg Church pastor asked that anyone interested in attending the Foreign Mission Study by our Director of Missions on December 4 at their church, please notify him.

A motion was passed to present Rev. R. Donald Wagner a Certificate of Appreciation for his 12 years of work in the Association while he was pastor of the Pilot Church. He served as moderator and on most all committees while in the Association.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Some time ago, a university professor was addressing a group of retired men. His topic was: "The Fading-out of the Country Church." "One by one," he said, "the country church is going out --passing from the scene." With great sorrow and lamentation, he pictured the scene. I do not believe he had visited in the Tar River Association. In nearly all the churches in the Tar River Association noted progress has been made....progress in physical plants, organization, and in church programs and spiritual growth. No "fading-out" has been noted.

From the **Newsletters** and **Highlites** published by the Director of Missions, the following bits of history have been noted:

On Sunday afternoon, June 25, the Bunn Baptist Church held appreciation services for their pastor, Rev. Alfred D. Snipes, Sr. and family upon completing ten years of service to the church and community. The Snipes were presented with a plaque commemorating their ten years of service and also a check for \$3,000.00. A reception was held immediately following the service.

At Duke Memorial, twenty-seven study course awards have been presented to fifteen individuals for the completion of one or more of the following studies: **Messages From First Century Christians, The Message We Proclaim, The Baptist Faith and Message, and Exodus, Call to Redemptive Missions.**

Dr. Merlin Boone and Rev. Ollie Layton began conducting morning worship services for migrant workers on the property of Mr. G. B. Ball.

During the year, the Flat Rock Church completed the remodeling of the sanctuary by adding new carpet, new cushioned pews to the wings and choir loft, cushioned all old pews, and added new draperies to the baptismal pool.

The Peachtree Church installed aluminum siding on all exposed wooden areas and painted the interior of the educational building during the past month.

On August 13, 1978, the Pearce Church ordained Rev. Ronnie Pierce into the gospel ministry.

The Spring Hope Church has replaced the sanctuary heating unit, insulated the sanctuary and parsonage, and air-conditioned the parsonage. The total cost of the work was \$10,323.00.

Extensive repairs and improvements to the church and sanctuary at Louisburg have been made.

On June 15, 1978, Dr. W. R. McCollum became the new Director of Missions for the Tar River Association.

During the summer 1978, a group of six women from Pilot went to Horon, South Dakota on an action mission effort. They conducted a survey in Vacation Bible School and painted the church building.

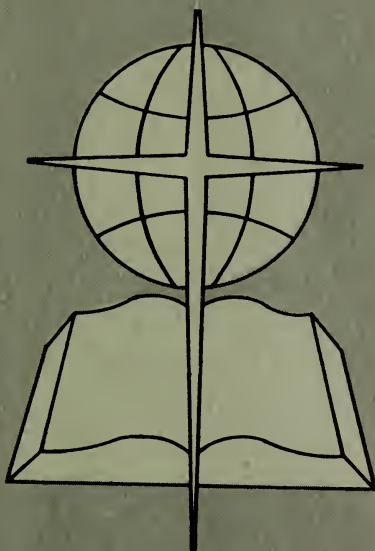

Constitution

ARTICLE I -- NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II -- PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

ARTICLE III -- MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet biannually in the Fall and Spring. The Fall session shall be primarily for business and the Spring session primarily for inspiration. The Annual Sermon shall be delivered during the Spring Season.

ARTICLE IV -- RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, and approval by a credentials committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator shall give the Messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V -- DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; messengers; give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter, these to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VI -- POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches, and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or-

church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII -- OFFICERS

The officers of the association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer (with the privilege of combining the office of Clerk and Treasurer), Auditor, Historian, Trustees, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Stewardship Chairman, Chairman of the Social Services Committee, and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee. The Moderator, the Vice-Moderator, the Clerk, the Historian, the Trustees, the Chairman of the Social Services Committee and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence at the conclusion of the session. The Treasurer and the auditor shall be elected at the Fall Meeting and their terms of office shall commence on January 1. The Sunday School Director, the Church Training Director, the Woman's Missionary Union Director, the Brotherhood Director, the Music Director, the Chairman of Evangelism and the Stewardship Chairman are to be elected in the spring meeting of the association and their terms of office shall commence upon election. The above officers shall be elected annually. At such times as the Association shall elect a Director of Missions, he becomes an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII -- DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, to enforce the rules, to preserve order, and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also serve ex-officio chairman of the Executive Committee of the Association. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, to serve as VB Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and to serve as Chairman of the Missions Committee.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the body, and use all diligence in having same printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible, to mail the church clerks reminders by church letters forthcoming and to keep on hand the printed Minutes and other important documents belonging to the body. He shall also serve as ex-officio secretary of the Executive Committee.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse the monies contributed for the expenses of the body as authorized by the Executive Body.

E. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and report to the Association annually.

F. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and to report at the annual session of the Association.

G. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to respond, within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he

shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special Committees authorized by the Association.

H. It shall be the duty of the Associational Church Training Director to promote the interests of Church Training within the bonds of the Association and to make to the Association as annual report of the work accomplished.

I. It shall be the duty of the Associational Sunday School Director to promote the interests of the Sunday Schools within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

J. It shall be the duty of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union within the Director to promote the interests of the Woman's Missionary Union within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished. This officers election may be a confirmation of election by the Associational Womens Missionary Union.

K. It shall be the duty of the Associational Brotherhood Director to promote interests of the Brotherhood within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

L. The Association Music Director shall plan and direct the music for all meetings of the Association and its Executive Committee and shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music in the churches of the Association.

M. Three (3) trustees shall be elected from the membership of the Association to hold title of all property of the Association, to act under the direction of the Association through its Executive Committee to execute necessary legal documents, and to supervise the maintenance of all property belonging to the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive by purchase, gift or otherwise title to real and personal property and to see, convey or mortgage same for the use and benefit of said Association and it officers and agents upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of said Tar River Association.

The trustees shall also be responsible for and keep an undated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association. An additional copy of this inventory shall be filled with the Treasurer and at the Associational Office.

Trustees are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

N. It shall be the duty of the Associational Stewardship Chairman to both encourage and keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the stewardship of the total Christian life and witness. He shall make an annual progress report to the Association.

O. The Moderator shall appoint the Parliamentarian at each session of the Association and/or Executive Committee Meeting.

ARTICLE IX – EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Associational Officers as setforth in Article VII, Director Missions, Moderator for past year, and Pastor and two members from each participating Church. Each church shall elect two members to serve on the Executive Committee prior to the regular Fall Annual Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Director Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee and does not have the power to vote.

C. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

1. The Executive Committee of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary and to define his duties.
2. To act for the Association between regular sessions of the body.

3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.
4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the Annual Budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.
6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Committee in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

ARTICLE X -- OTHER COMMITTEES

The following committees whose duties are prescribed below shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the Fall Meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the Fall Meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new committee will take office.

A. Nominating Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to nominate the members of the various committees and Chairmen and associational officers deemed necessary to facilitate the work of the Association. The Nominating Committee will be appointed hereafter by the Moderator of the Association. This Committee shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. Credentials Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to provide the Association with Authority for operation to determine the extent of the powers of the Association and to examine Articles of Faith and recommend the admission of new churches to the Association. It is the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association by badges as voting members of the Association.

D. Finance Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to propose a budget to the Executive Committee and to suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. The Committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. This Committee shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer shall serve as ex-officio member of this committee.

D. Resolutions Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to receive all resolutions presented to the Association.

This Committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting. Officers of the Association, etc.

E. Time, Place and Preacher Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational Meeting.

F. Missions Committee composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Chairman, Stewardship Chairman, and three (3) members at large, whose duty will be to assist the Director of Missions in the planning, promoting, and execution of Associational programs making recommendations to the Executive Committee.

G. Program Committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association whose duty shall be to receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Missions Committee Chairman, Director of Missions) draft and present the program, in printed form, for the sessions of the Association, which, upon the adoption by the Association,, shall become its order of business. The host pastors shall be included in this Committee.

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H. Constitutional Committee shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes.

I. Social Services Committee shall be composed of one representative each of the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Homes for Aging and Baptist Hospital whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of these institutions.

J. Christian Education Committee shall be composed of a Christian Literature Representative, a Christian Education Representative, and one member at large whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

ARTICLE XI -- ORDAINING COUNCIL

In order to preserve the Baptist position with reference to the divine call to the ministry, and to recognize the responsibility of a local church to the entire Baptist denomination, the Association shall elect annually an ordaining council that may act in an advisory capacity for churches seeking its assistance. In setting up this Council and in its work, the following things are to be noted:

A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership and the request from the church come to the Association through the moderator or the Association Office.

B. That the church in which the candidate holds membership elect to the Council three members, one of them the pastor, provided he is not the candidate for ordination.

C. That the Tar River Association elect six members to constitute a standing ordaining council, to serve with the three members appointed by the local church, one of which shall be designated chairman by the Moderator. These shall serve terms of three years, and shall be ineligible to succeed themselves.

D. That the Council then proceed in the usual Baptist method and policy for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

E. That we encourage insofar as it is practical public ordination services.

F. That the Tar River Association furnish the minister thus set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry by this Council with credentials signed by the Moderator and Clerk of the Association and by each member of the Council.

ARTICLE XII -- VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XIII -- AMENDMENTS

This Constitution or the By-Laws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment (s) will be presented to afternoon session and voted on no earlier than evening session.

ARTICLE XIV - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert Rules of Order.

BY-LAWS

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.
4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.
5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.
6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.
7. All resolutions must be stated in writing and handed to the Clerk.
8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.
9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.
10. Reports of Committees on Convention objects must be brief - that on Missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.
11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.
12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to:

13. The Clerk and Treasurer shall receive honorariums to be determined by the Executive Committee for their services as an expression of appreciation.
14. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

HISTORY OF BUNN BAPTIST CHURCH

In April 1875, a group of people living in the vicinity of Bunn schoolhouse came together and decided to organize a Sunday School. The local schoolhouse was to be the meeting place. It was located about three hundred yards east of the junction of highways 39 and 98 at what is now called Old Bunn, on or near the lot now owned by P.N. Breedlove. It was constructed of logs, with a board roof and a stick and dirt fireplace and chimney.

This crude one-room meeting place was not their greatest difficulty. None of the people had experience in Sunday School work. They had not led in public prayer nor had anyone any experience speaking in public. To overcome this handicap, they contacted Mr. Clinton Perry and asked him to organize and superintend the new Sunday School. Mr. Perry lived across the Tar River about three miles away from the schoolhouse. He accepted, walked the distance, and rowed a boat across the Tar River to keep the appointments each Sunday.

After serving for a few months, Mr. Perry resigned. He told the people they could carry on without him.

A.J. White was then elected and served until his death in 1898, except for a two-year interval, 1894-95, when J.H. Cheves served. Those serving from 1898 to 1910 were: J.M. White, C.T. Cheves, W.E. Weathers, J.H. Mullen, J.N. Perry. The service of Mr. J.N. Perry continued until 1933.

About 1880, a new one-room frame school was built at the junction of the roads in Old Bunn. The Sunday School was held there until 1904, when a new building was erected about 100 yards south of the older building. It was in this building that Bunn Baptist Church was organized in 1911. Officers of the new church were: G.A. Alford, church clerk; J.R. White, treasurer; J.N. Perry, superintendent. The charter deacons were J.H. Odum, S.J. Alford, and J.R. Wright.

The charter membership of Bunn Baptist Church was composed entirely of members of Poplar Springs Baptist Church, which was a large rural church covering a large territory at the close of the 19th century. Other churches which have organized from Poplar Springs since 1900 are Pilot, Pearce, and Pine Ridge.

Bunn Church continued to meet in the schoolhouse at Old Bunn until 1914 when it moved to the new school building on the present campus. The church met there until 1917 when the present building was completed on lots given by the North State Development Company of Rocky Mount, North Carolina.

One is able to see today evidence of those early days because items are still in use. P.G. Hartsill, father of Pastor W.H. Hartsill, made the lectern in 1916 which is used today. Names on the beautiful memorial windows represent ways families helped to pay for the church and show their love at the same time.

In 1950, the organ was given by Mrs. Lorraine W. Mullen in memory of her husband, C. Horace Mullen, who was killed October 8, 1944 while in the U.S. Air Force in Italy. At the same time, the chimes were given by Mr. R.I. Mitchell and family. Also in 1950, Mr. C.C. Pippin and family gave the baptistry in memory of his wife, Mrs. Bessie H. Pippin. About the same time, Rev. A.S. Lamm and his family gave the choir chairs. The Hymnal board was presented by Mrs. J.H. Mullen in memory of Mr. Mullen.

The parsonage was built by the church in 1948 on a lot given by Dr. S.W. Perry and Mrs. Perry. The Educational building was completed in 1960, representing a need from years past. One of the greatest improvements on the sanctuary was completed in 1966 when the basement was remodeled and an up-to-date lighting system was installed throughout the church. During the past summer, 1969, the entire sanctuary was air-conditioned through the central heating system. One other item of interest to some might be to learn that at one time this was a brown church. But in April, 1955, the church voted to paint it white with a green roof. Mr. Carol Brian of Jacksonville, N.C. donated the paint.

Pastors and dates of service are as follows: G.M. Duke, 1911-13; W.H. Hartsill, 1914-18; T.D. Collins, 1919, W.R. Burnell, 1920-21; Mack Stamps, 1922-24; W.T. Brown, 1925-28; C.E. Crawford, 1928-37; P.P. Hartsill, 1937-38; M.H. Barnett, 1938-39; Wayne Oates, 1940-41; A.S. Lamm, 1944-46;

W.C. Blue, 1947-48; A.S. Lamm, 1948-53; Robert Mulinax, 1954-57; R.L. Coffman, 1957-63; J. Howard Silvers, 1964-67; Alfred Snipes, 1968-.

Since 1968, when the church adopted a ten-year-long plan, many improvements have been made. The first major building project involved a new pastorium which was completed in 1971.

Later a paved tennis court was added on the church campus. A new organ was purchased and the choir received new robes in 1975. A bus was bought to aid the youth musical group. It is used for senior citizen groups also.

In late 1977, major renovation was completed in the sanctuary. A new baptistry was added, and re-location of the choir gave opportunity for seating behind the pulpit. New carpet was laid and the interior was painted. In 1978, storm plate glass was added to protect the beautiful stained glass windows. Also in 1978, a mural was painted on canvas for the baptistry and new choir pews were given.

At this point in time, ten years of plans and projects have been completed. Another long-range plans committee is to undertake to lay out goals for the next five to ten years. It is our prayer that such goals will give priority to the spiritual growth within the church membership. As we move with our fellow Christians in the Bold Ministry of caring, sharing, and going.

Bunn Baptist Church has a resident membership of 247. Sunday School enrollment is 164. Cooperative giving and to all missions is greater than 10% of the budget which is \$26,580.00 for 1979.

The prayer of many folk at Bunn Baptist Church is that God will call from among us, one who is a strong leader and empower that person to move with the direction of the Holy Spirit to make Jesus the Lord of His house. His will be done here on earth as it is in heaven. Amen.

HISTORY OF HOLLY GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

Prior to 1913, the people in Holly Grove Community went to Sunday School at the Creek schoolhouse and Cypress Chapel Church.

The first meeting to organize Holly Grove Church was held in 1913. They met under some shade trees close to where the present church building now stands. The next meeting was held under two bush arbor where the present church meets.

Holly Grove Baptist Church was formally organized in September of 1916 with Staley McGregor as pastor. The name Holly Grove was chosen because of the abundance of Holly Grove trees surrounding the location.

About twenty members made up the first congregation at Holly Grove. These hardy folks gave the land, the timber, and the labor to build their first church building.

Holly Grove became associated with the Tar River Association during their first year of existence (1916).

Records are scarce for the first several years at Holly Grove. We do know that the first Sunday School classes were held in the sanctuary with curtains dividing them.

The first parsonage was built in 1960 by the men of the church. The church members donated the lumber and the labor.

A new brick educational building was erected in February of 1973 at a cost of \$20,000. Dedication services were conducted by Rev. Keith Hart.

A new \$60,000 sanctuary was dedicated October 7, 1974 with Rev. Tommy Hayes leading the services. The first baptismal services in the new sanctuary were celebrated November 3, 1974. A note-burning ceremony was held for the new sanctuary, the 5th Sunday in October 1978.

HISTORY OF CYPRESS CHAPEL BAPTIST CHURCH

Because of a strong feeling that the Cypress Community needed its own church, Elders T.M.L. Finch, E. Macon, J.K. White, and M.L. Freeman met with charter members Abiah Ross and Martha Mann of Peachtree and Alexander F. Wiggs of Flat Rock in 1855 and organized a new church. The name Cypress Chapel was chosen because these charter members all lived on or near Cypress Creek. The original site of the church was about four miles east of Bunn just off the road which leads from Anderson's Bridge to Louisburg.

Elder M.L. Freeman was the first pastor of Cypress Chapel with services being held the third Sunday of each month. At the end of the first year, there was a total of ten members--six white and four black. With this handful of witnesses and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, the work of spreading the Gospel in the Cypress Community was begun.

In August 1856, during the Associational meeting held at Salem Church in Wilson County, Cypress Chapel was received into the Tar River Association. By 1865, the membership had grown to 37. In 1869, the first mention of gifts

to missions shows Cypress Chapel gave \$3.10 to foreign missions, \$1.90 to home missions, and \$.50 to education. These amounts were extra good considering the whole Association reported only \$5.60, \$14.80, and \$10.00 respectively. This indicates that Cypress Chapel had a strong missionary zeal, especially for foreign missions, early in its life.

The year 1875 was a big year in that Cypress Chapel first had a Sunday School. Classes were first held in the old schoolhouse at Seven Paths which was about two miles from the site of the church. Only eleven other churches in the Association had Sunday Schools at that time. During the first year, Cypress Chapel had an enrollment of 39 and an average attendance of 24. Sunday School was held only for five or six months during the first two years, but in 1877 was kept open for ten months. The Sunday School apparently had effects on conversions, with 15 being reported for 1877.

In 1895, interest mounted toward bringing the Church and the Sunday School together. Land was secured just south of the Seven Paths crossroads on the road leading to Spring Hope. It was decided to relocate Cypress Chapel Church from its original site on Cypress Creek to its present location. Part of the original building was used to build the new Church, which was completed in 1896, and is still in use today. With funds being hard to secure, Mr. W.A. Moore mortgaged his home so necessary funds would be available to complete the church building. The debt was paid off shortly after Mr. Moore's death in 1900.

Soon after the relocation, membership increased to 74 with three black members remaining. These three black remained members until their deaths. Also during this period, the time of meeting was changed from the third Sunday to the fourth Saturday and Sunday of each month, with preaching and conference on Saturday and preaching again on Sunday. This was done in order to conform with the pattern of other churches of that time.

By 1905, membership had climbed to 110; and by 1914, more land was purchased and more teaching space added to the church. In this same year, the W.M.U. was organized. Miss Emma Gay served as the first president and there were 36 members.

In 1918, a plan of systematic giving was adopted and the building committee proceeded with plans to add more space to the building. By 1922, the membership had reached 233, with Sunday School enrollment of 172. During the early 20's, the Sunday School achieved Standard A-1 status as recognized by the Baptist Sunday School Board. Twelve new classrooms were added with most of the labor and materials being donated by the members themselves. The value of the church property was then estimated at \$4,500.

In 1944, additional remodeling was done to improve teaching facilities. Carpet was also placed in the auditorium for the first time.

Until 1954, Cypress Chapel had remained a part-time church, being on the same field with Ephesus Church of Spring Hope. In this year, a full-time program was begun and T.M. Allred was called as the first full-time pastor. Realizing the importance of the pastor living in the community, members began work themselves on a parsonage adjoining the church yard. The house was completed early in 1954 and was valued at \$8,000. This was indeed a big undertaking for the membership of 200 who had experienced serious financial

setbacks as a result of three years of drought. However, the members donated most of the materials and nearly all of the labor. The parsonage was completed at a very minimum expense and the entire amount was paid off by time of formal dedication on July 4, 1954.

On June 26, 1955, Cypress Chapel celebrated its 100th anniversary. Dr. W.R. Cullom, who had served as Interim Pastor at Cypress Chapel during 1948-1949, delivered the morning message. Douglas M. Branch, who was president of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina delivered the Centennial address during the afternoon. Area churches which took part in the celebration and helped provide special music were Bunn, Duke Memorial, Ephesus, Holly Grove, Peachtree, and Spring Hope.

In 1959, the classrooms on the back of the church were moved away from the main building. The sanctuary was renovated and new church furniture purchased in 1960. In 1962, the front part of the church was rebuilt to include a porch and a new steeple.

Cypress Chapel has had 38 pastors in its 124-year history. It has ordained six men into the ministry. The present pastor, Tim Bradley, has served the church since April 1977.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association has met two times since the Fall meeting of the Association.

December 18, 1978: Moderator was Mr. Larry Strickland, vice moderator of the Association.

Roll call by the clerk showed 69 present representing 28 churches.

Dr. W.R. McCollum showed a film on "Bold Mission Thrust" which is available for any church to use.

The Missions Committee offered a recommendation that Laymen's Day in the churches be revived as it was eight or ten years ago. Recommendation was adopted.

Rev. Alfred D. Snipes made a motion which was passed, that the churches provide the missionary with names, as a source, of men who would fill the pulpit in churches in the Association.

Dr. Merlin Boone reported two Seminary Extension classes would be held; he teaching on Evangelism in Louisburg and Rev. John Link on Mark at Ephesus.

Mr. Maylon J. Frazier gave the treasurer's report showing a balance on hand November 30 of \$8,236.72, checking and savings account.

Mrs. Halsy Davis reported 125 attended the WMU workshop in September. The churches had Week of Prayer programs and offerings for Lottie Moon Christmas offering. The director recommended that the Baptist Women have a "Baptist Women's Day" in the churches during Focus Week.

Our director, Mr. McCollum expressed thanks for everything including the Christmas gift they received.

He asked for volunteers who would take a course to train them to be able to witness to the Spanish-speaking migrant workers during the summer.

Mr. Larry Strickland reporting for the Missions Committee presented figures that showed the Association received 1.45 percent of income in the churches. They recommended that we give at least three percent.

March 26, 1979: Rev. Lyman Wilson was moderator. Fifty-six were present representing 24 churches.

Mr. Larry Strickland reported the Mission Committee received approval of \$1,800.00 to the Association from the State Convention for this year.

A letter was received through the Association inviting our Director of Missions, Mr. McCollum, to preach for a week in Utah in pioneer missions.

Mr. Larry Strickland made a motion to bear the expense of \$249.00 for a ticket to fly to Utah.

Rev. Merlin Boone made an amendment to the motion to make this a round figure of \$300.00 to allow extra for expenses as he sees fit. The amendment passed and motion then passed as amended.

Rev. Merlin Boone for Seminary Extension announced 18 were enrolled at Ephesus and 13 at Louisburg.

Mr. McCollum announced the Sunday School Training Clinic to be Monday, April 30, and the Vacation Bible School Clinic to be April 9 and 10 at White Level and Flat Rock churches.

Rev. A.S. Tomlinson added he would have a class at the Bible School clinic for adults.

A motion was passed to purchase the film, "The Devil and the Association" and make it available to the churches. Mr. McCollum had shown the film at the beginning of this meeting.

Rev. Alfred D. Snipes announced the Association would be meeting April 23 at Bunn Church with Holly Grove and Cypress Chapel assisting with registration to begin at 3:45.

Rev. A.S. Tomlinson reported that Rev. Jack Sammons and the others involved would come to Peachtree May 21 to hold the Evangelism Conference which was not held because of snow.

The pastors of the Association through the Pastors' Conference said they took up a love offering and purchased a plaque and presented it to the family of Rev. Robert McCormick who died.

The moderator asked we stand in silent memory and meditation in behalf of Mr. McCormick and his family.

HISTORY OF FRANKLINTON BAPTIST CHURCH

The need of a church or a place of worship was felt in Franklinton in 1855. At first, Elder U.M. Wingate and U.T. Walters were appointed to preach on alternate Sundays in Franklinton. Since there was no church in the town, these two men were granted permission by D.S. Richardson, principal of Franklin Institute, to use the academy building for services.

The first missionary Baptist Church of Franklinton was built on the corner of South Main Street and Green Street. Around 1890, this building was sold to a negro congregation. After this, services were held in the Ballard-Cheatham building at the corner of Front Street and East Mason Street until the present church was built. The cornerstone for the present church was laid in 1893. The church was completed in 1895 at a cost of \$8,000. The church was built on land given by Captain J.S. Joyner. The brick for the church was made in a brick kiln owned by Captain Joyner.

Dr. W.M. Wingate, president of Wake Forest College, was largely responsible for the first church in Franklinton being built. He served as the first pastor and served through 1872.

During the early years, race was not a factor in becoming a member of the church. The membership of the church in 1860 was 34, with 14 of these being negro. In 1865, the membership was 67 with 37 of them negro. One negro was still a member in 1866 but no record of any since then.

The church was taken into the Tar River Association in 1858. Soon after 1860, the Franklinton, Flat Rock, and Wake Forest churches asked permission to leave the Tar River Association to form a new Association. This permission was granted and the Central Association was formed. In 1944, this Association merged with the Raleigh Association. In 1950, the church withdrew from the Raleigh Association and joined the Flat River Association. After staying there awhile, the Franklinton church decided in 1959 to return to the Tar River Association. During the time from 1865 to the present, the Franklinton Church has been the host church for many associational meetings.

From 1873 to 1886, the following ministers, Dr. William Royal, Dr. W.R. Brooks, Reverend C.A. Jenkins and Reverend A.G. McManaway served as pastors of the church. From 1886-1890, Reverend Baylus Cade was pastor. He returned in 1894 for one year. The church was served from 1891-1893 by Dr. John Mitchell as interim pastor. Reverend Jasper Howell, Reverend A.A. Butler, and Reverend J.B. Harrell served from 1895 to 1903 as pastors. In 1903, the Reverend T.B. Justice was called as pastor and served here through 1909.

Prior to 1903, only one change had been made to the building. This was the addition of the classroom for the men. While Reverend Justice was here, the baptistry was installed on the right of the pulpit. The choir was on the left of the pulpit. There were three classrooms back of the pulpit. The pulpit area remained this way until 1948 when Mr. Hubert H. Utley had it remodeled in memory of his wife, Mary Shannon Patterson Utley. This remodeling placed the choir loft and baptistry directly behind the pulpit.

The first parsonage was built while Reverend Justice was here. It was on the lot back of the church. The lumber for the parsonage was furnished by Perry's

Church and Mr. Simon Williams paid for the labor. This parsonage was used until 1970 when the present two-story brick dwelling was built at a cost of approximately \$40,000.

During the time that the first parsonage was built, the pastor served the Franklinton Church and the Perry's Church. While Reverend Biddle was pastor, the Franklinton Church went to a full-time pastor.

The Woman's Missionary Society was organized also while Reverend Justice was in Franklinton. Since that time, the members of the Missionary Society have played an important part, with its leaders, in getting things done for the church.

From 1910-1917, Reverend J.B. Harrell was pastor, followed by Reverend C.S. Dowell from 1918 to 1924. The Reverends S.L. Blanton and R.L. Randolph were pastors from 1924 to 1935.

The first youth organization of the church was started by Reverend S.L. Blanton. It was the Baptist Young People Union.

In 1935, Reverend John Biddle was called as pastor of the church and he served through 1940. Reverend Biddle saw the need of an education building. He had the faith and determination needed to do something about getting this building. He borrowed a cement block making machine from Mr. G.L. Whitfield. With this machine, one load of sand and a five-dollar donation from a Methodist, the building was started. The building was completed debt free and named "The Biddle Building."

The Reverends D.D. Gross, Bruce Hartsell, Charles McConnell, and W.B. Pittard, Jr. served as pastors from 1941 to 1952.

In the summer of 1952, Reverend Thomas J. Holmes was called as pastor. Reverend Holmes soon saw the need for an additional educational building. The church voted to borrow money for this building. The plans for the building as well as the supervision of the construction of the building was done by Mr. P.P. Purnell. The building was completed at the approximate cost of \$35,000 and was named "The Purnell Building."

Reverend Herbert Luehrs was pastor for a short while and was followed by Reverend Dwight W. Cooper in 1955, who served the church until 1960.

On January 29, 1956, John R. Ball was ordained as a minister.

Reverend Fate Thomas served the church from 1960 to October 1962. During the time we were without a pastor, Dr. Eugene Owens from Southeastern Seminary served as interim pastor until Reverend Lloyd Jackson accepted the call and served as pastor from 1963-1968. During the time Reverend Jackson was here, the north wall of the church was replaced. Worship services were held in the fellowship hall of the Purnell Building during the time the wall was being fixed.

In 1956, the church employed its first part-time educational director, Mr. Jim Annis. Since then the church has had a part-time educational director or minister of music until this position was changed to full-time in 1973.

The church kindergarten was initiated in September 1967 and operated until July 1974 when the Franklinton Day Care Center was opened.

In January 1969, the Reverend Horace L. Jackson was called as pastor of the church and served it until September 1974. Tremendous progress was made during this time in all areas of the church, including a bus ministry and a children's church for ages four to grade five.

Since its inception in the early seventies, the Brotherhood has been a strong arm of the church. Visits to Butner, rest homes, and vesper services have been some of their many projects.

The first women to serve on the Board of Deacons were Mrs. Daisy Hale and Mrs. Annie Utley. They were ordained June 29, 1969.

In 1972, the church took part in a Festival of Faith Revival under the direction of Dr. Myers Hicks and other Christians from Florence, South Carolina. A great revival took place in our church and many souls were brought to Christ.

The Extension Department, now the Homebound Department, has provided an excellent program for the older members of our church and community through the years.

The Sunday School hit an all-time high in attendance in 1973-74 under the leadership of Mrs. W.B. Gordon and Dr. S.E. Eakes.

The first Youth Revival was held in the church in 1974 under the leadership of the Youth Evangelistic Team of the North Carolina Baptist Convention.

Due to the growth of the church, Mr. C.L. King was called as associate pastor in charge of music and outreach in 1973. He continued in this position until March 1975.

Reverend Deryl B. Holliday was pastor of the church from April 1975 to August 1977. During this time, the church took part in the Bicentennial activities of our country. The church slogan was "Let Christ Freedom Ring Through Franklinton Baptist Church."

Reverend Donald W. Laine was the associate pastor and minister of music from August 1975 to September 1977. He planned many programs for the older members of the church as well as the youth.

Jim Rivers was ordained as a minister in May 1976. In May 1977, Grady Edwards was ordained into the ministry.

Since March 1978, the Reverend Jack B. Sammons has been the pastor of the church. In October 1978, Reverend Ralph Jett was called as Minister of Youth and Music.

The members of the church approved a renovation project of the educational buildings in December 1978. Most of this work has been completed at an approximate cost of \$60,000.

The Youth Revival during the summer of 1979 was very successful, with many decisions for Christ being made.

The Franklinton Baptist Church has been richly blessed during its long history. We continue to seek the Lord's will in all of the plans for the future of the church.

BRIEF HISTORY OF UNION VIEW BAPTIST CHURCH

On July 3, 1944, the Union View Baptist Church was organized with Red Garner from the First Baptist Church in Henderson bringing the message, and the Rev. A.W. Icard, who came to Franklinton in April 1944 and preached a revival, then later started preaching twice a month, was called as pastor, and served the church until March 1955.

The church was organized in a one-room building that was located on the adjoining lot to the present church building where the parsonage was before moving it to Franklin Street. The one-room building and lot was later purchased from Mr. J.P. Jenkins. It was in this one-room building that the church was organized into a Missionary Baptist Church.

The church was organized with the following charter members of which the following are dead: Mr. and Mrs. Nick Hobgood, Mr. Clem Williams, Mrs. Mattie Tant, and the whereabouts of Mr. Frank Edwards in questionable. The living are: Mrs. Naomi Williams, Mr. and Mrs. Lummie Bridges, Mrs. Annie Jackson, and Mrs. Cora Lee May.

The Sunday School was organized in March 1944 before the church was organized. The prayer meeting began October 7, 1945, the Daniels Cottage prayer band that was named by Mrs. Tommy Sudden, and began under the direction of Rev. Tommy Sudden was started in 1947, was held on Sunday nights until the church went on full time, and then was changed to Saturday nights and has continued ever since.

It was near the year of 1948 that Mr. Joe Peace Jenkins gave the lot on which the present church building was erected, and the first service in this church was October 3, 1948, but full time service did not begin until 1955.

In March of 1955, Rev. A.W. Icard resigned the church and the Rev. Bob Clegg supplied until the Rev. W.C. Barham came on June 26, 1955 and was pastor until October 27, 1957. After the leaving of Rev. Barham, different ministers supplied until the Rev. Marvin Dameron came to Union View in January 1958 and remained until July 25, 1965. Upon the departure of Rev. Dameron, the Rev. Robert Brooks supplied until the Rev. Glenn Short was called in September 1965. Rev. Short served until 1970. After others supplied the pulpit, Rev. Joe Wren was called as pastor in 1971. He served the church until 1974. Again others supplied the pulpit until Rev. Larry Boswell was called as pastor in 1975. He served the church until August 1978. The Rev. Norman Baird, a native of Ireland, served as interim pastor from that point until June 1979. At this time the church called their present pastor Rev. David Schell.

Through the planning and organization of both the pastors and members of the church, Union View has experienced a rapid growth since 1944, and in addition to the growth mentioned, in the past several years, a Training Union, W.M.U., under the direction of Mrs. Marvin Dameron and Mrs. Rosa Colbert, and through the W.M.U., the age groups have been organized including the Sunbeams, G.A.'s, Y.W.A., R.A.'s, and at the present, a men's organization is in the making.

In addition, there have been four ministers that have gone out from the church: Rev. F.G. Alford, Rev. H.D. Harris, Rev. Reid Winstead, and Bobby Ray Harris, with two ministers within the church, James Weaver and Perry Jordon.

It was in 1962 that the two rooms and vestibule, installation of windows and purchasing of an organ and the bricking of the church was completed. In 1963, the church organized a mission at the county jail and the Pine Rest Home. In May of 1967, the parsonage was moved to Franklin Street.

The present membership is 386.

CHURCH TRAINING REPORT

The 1978 Minutes of the Tar River Association reflect very little evidence of church training activities. Franklinton, Hopkins Chapel, Maple Springs, and Union View are the only churches with traditional Training Union programs. These organizations are weak as far as attendance goes having a total average weekly attendance of less than one hundred people. Many churches have very little in the way of short term training programs. This is best illustrated by the statistic that only five of the forty-three churches have any training program for their deacons. It is little wonder that statistical tables for Baptist organizations throughout the state and nation show a general decline or a no-growth pattern.

There are at least two main reasons for this. They are:

- (1) lack of long term commitment
- (2) lack of rigorous and continuing training

A life dedicated to God through Jesus Christ will remove the first reason. If this is followed by a well-organized church training program, the second reason for lack of Christian growth will disappear.

EVANGELISM REPORT

The Holy Spirit working through pastors and lay people across our Association has stopped the decline in baptisms. We are not showing any significant increase over 1976 (our base year) but we have had many more souls coming to the Lord this year than we did last year.

Several things have been done in our state and across our Association this past year to make us more aware of the need for evangelism on a continuing basis.

Over 2500 pastors and lay persons across our state attended the Statewide Evangelism Conference in Fayetteville, North Carolina, during February 5-6, 1979. The conference will be held in Greensboro during February 4-5, 1980.

Many young people accepted Christ during the Statewide Youth Evangelism night in Greensboro on August 17, 1979. Some of these young people were from our own area. This rally will be held again in Greensboro on August 15, 1980.

Our Associational Evangelism Conference was held at Peachtree Baptist Church on May 21 and was very successful. The 1980 conference will be held in our Association on February 25, 1980, with both an afternoon clinic and evening rally. The place will be announced later.

We had two good nights in the Evangelism sessions of the Associational Key Leadership Conferences held at Louisburg and Spring Hope churches during August 20-21, 1979. I had the opportunity to be trained for this conference by attending the Statewide Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest during May 14-16, 1979. This conference will also be held at Ridgecrest in May of 1980.

Many decisions for Christ have been made across our state as the result of four Summer Youth Evangelism teams holding one-week revivals in 36 churches. One church from our Association had a team in July 1979. We hope others will be in the summer of 1980.

Almost 100% of our churches have had some kind of concentrated outreach evangelistic effort during 1979. Some outstanding nationally known evangelists have held revivals in some of our churches and other churches have experienced a real outpouring of the Holy Spirit in drawing persons to Christ.

Continue to pray for the evangelistic effort across our Association, state, nation and world.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee members are the officers of the Association -- pastors and two members from each church. There have been two meetings since the Spring Session.

June 18, 1979 - Thirty-five were present representing twenty-one churches. A motion was passed to transfer \$1100.00 interest accumulated on savings to checking account.

Rev. Kenneth Batts reported ninety-two attended the Vacation Bible School clinic.

The Missions Committee offered three recommendations which were adopted.

1. That the Executive Committee endorse a request to the N.C. State Convention by Bethlehem Baptist Church for pastoral aid in the amount of \$3,850.00 annually.

2. That the Association will pay 15 cents per mile for mileage and that the maximum expense for breakfast would be \$2.50; lunch \$3.50; and dinner \$5.00. It was pointed out that these are included in the budget under department heads. These would be guidelines only and not to be exceeded.

3. That all Association Seminary Extension courses shall be approved by the Christian Education Committee and all expenses and income from tuition, books, etc. shall be handled by the Associational treasurer.

A motion was passed to purchase a push mower; not to exceed \$130.00, as recommended by the trustees for the missionary's home.

Dr. W.R. McCollum reported he needs to know how many churches will be involved in the World Missions Conference.

He has the film, "The Devil and the Baptist Association" and it is available to the churches.

He announced the Key Leadership Conferences August 19 and 20.

He said \$150.00 would be needed by May from the churches participating in World Missions Conference.

Rev. Jack Sammons reported thirty-five attended the Evangelism Conference at Peachtree. He reported baptisms not good but had improved in the Association. He was pleased he said, with attitudes and spirit of the Southern Baptist Convention.

September 24, 1979 - Fifty-three were present from 23 churches. The treasurer's report showing \$7,145.71 on hand was adopted.

Mrs. Nan Jones presented the Proposed Budget for 1980, which was adopted for presentation to the Association.

Mr. Larry Strickland for the Missions Committee presented the Calendar of Events which was adopted after two changes.

Rev. Jack Sammons encouraged attendance at the meeting of the Association October 15 at Franklinton, with Union View assisting.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

In the Tar River Baptist Association there are three categories of service meshed in the area of Christian Education. These are Seminary Extension, Christian Higher Education, and Christian Literature and Libraries.

The goals of Seminary Extension are bringing continuing theological education within reach of every minister and providing lay church leaders a new depth of learning and a means to equip themselves for a wider range of service through the church. Our Association is indeed fortunate to have Southeastern Seminary nearby inasmuch as it helps us realize these goals. Our Association has two Seminary Extension Centers, Hickory Rock and Spring Hope, this year from September 11 through November 6. Charles Hayes and Shelby Stephens will be teaching Ephesians in preparation for the January Bible Study, 1980.

The people of our Association, along with all North Carolina Baptists, should be grateful and proud of our seven Baptist Colleges and Universities. Those in our state are Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest, and Wingate. According to the latest figures printed by the Education Commission, SBC, of the 134,000 students attending the 53 Baptist Colleges in the Convention, almost 20,000, or 15%, are enrolled in our North Carolina Schools. Baptist Colleges want to enroll and educate students from Baptist churches. Pastors and others who work with youth in the churches are urged to encourage their young people to seek admission to a North Carolina Baptist college.

TAR RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

A relatively new term introduced in the Association this year is "Church media center." There are presently 10 reported church media centers/libraries in the Association. A media center should be thought of as a service organization supporting the total work of the church by providing media, promoting media, and educating church leaders and members in the use of media. The media center ministry is valuable to a church as it seeks to worship God, to educate its members, to minister to the needs of people, and to proclaim the gospel. At the Bold Missions Key Leadership Conference in August, eight church librarians met and expressed a desire for training classes and an Associational Church Media Center Organization. Such an organization would serve as a major means for helping churches begin, extend, and improve this vital ministry. Training sessions already scheduled for the upcoming year are the 1980 State Library Conference, April 12-13 at Black Mountain and Asheville and the SBC Church Media Center Conference at Ridgecrest June 30-July 4, 1980.

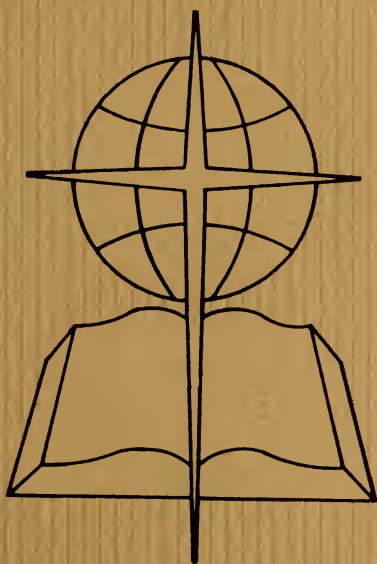

Constitution

ARTICLE I -- NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II -- PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

ARTICLE III -- MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet biannually in the Fall and Spring. The Fall session shall be primarily for business and the Spring session primarily for inspiration. The Annual Sermon shall be delivered during the Spring Session.

ARTICLE IV -- RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, and approval by a credentials committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator shall give the Messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V -- DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; messengers; give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter, these to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VI -- POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches, and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purpose, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII -- OFFICERS

The officers of the association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer (with the privilege of combining the office of Clerk and Treasurer), Auditor, Historian, Trustees, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Stewardship Chairman, Chairman of the Social Services Committee, and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee. The Moderator, the Vice-Moderator, the Clerk, the Historian, the Trustees, the Chairman of the Social Services Committee and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence at the conclusion of the session. The Treasurer and the auditor shall be The Sunday School Director, the Church Training Director, the Woman's Missionary Union Director, the Brotherhood Director, the Music Director, the Chairman of Evangelism and the Stewardship Chairman are to be elected in the spring meeting of the association and their terms of office shall commence upon election. The above officers shall be elected annually. At such times as the Association shall elect a Director of Missions, he becomes an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII -- DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, to enforce the rules, to preserve order, and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also serve ex-officio chairman of the Executive Committee of the Association. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, to serve as Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and to serve as Chairman of the Missions Committee.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the body, and use all diligence in having same printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible, to mail the church clerks reminders by church letters forthcoming and to keep on hand the printed Minutes and other important documents belonging to the body. He shall also serve as ex-officio secretary of the Executive Committee.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse the monies contributed for the expenses of the body as authorized by the Executive Body.

E. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and report to the Association annually.

F. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and to report at the annual session of the Association.

G. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to respond, within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special Committees authorized by the Association.

H. It shall be the duty of the Associational Church Training Director to promote the interests of Church Training within the bonds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

I. It shall be the duty of the Associational Sunday School Director to promote the interests of the Sunday Schools within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

J. It shall be the duty of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union within the Director to promote the interests of the Woman's Missionary Union within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished. This officers election may be a confirmation of election by the Associational Womens Missionary Union.

K. It shall be the duty of the Associational Brotherhood Director to promote interests of the Brotherhood within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

L. The Association Music Director shall plan and direct the music for all meetings of the Association and its Executive Committee and shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music in the churches of the Association.

M. Three (3) trustees shall be elected from the membership of the Association to hold title of all property of the Association, to act under the direction of the Association through its Executive Committee to execute necessary legal documents, and to supervise the maintenance of all property belonging to the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive by purchase, gift or otherwise title to real and personal property and to see, convey or mortgage same for the use and benefit of said Association and it officers and agents upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of said Tar River Association.

The trustees shall also be responsible for and keep an undated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association. An additional copy of this inventory shall be filed with the Treasurer and at the Associational Office.

Trustees are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

N. It shall be the duty of the Associational Stewardship Chairman to both encourage and keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the stewardship of the total Christian life and witness. He shall make an annual progress report to the Association.

O. The Moderator shall appoint the Parlimentarian at each session of the Association and/or Executive Committee Meeting.

ARTICLE IX -- EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Associational Officers as setforth in Article VII, Director Missions, Moderator for past year, and Pastor and two members from each participating Church. Each church shall elect two members to serve on the Executive Committee prior to the regular Fall Annual Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Director Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee and does not have the power to vote.

C. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

1. The Executive Committee of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary and to define his duties.
2. To act for the Association between regular sessions of the body.
3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.
4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the Annual Budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.

6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Committee in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

ARTICLE X -- OTHER COMMITTEES

The following committees whose duties are prescribed below shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the Fall Meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the Fall Meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new committee will take office.

A. Nominating Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to nominate the members of the various committees and Chairmen and associational officers deemed necessary to facilitate the work of the Association. The Nominating Committee will be appointed hereafter by the Moderator of the Association. This Committee shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. Credentials Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to provide the Association with Authority for operation to determine the extent of the powers of the Association and to examine Articles of Faith and recommend the admission of new churches to the Association. It is the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association by badges as voting members of the Association.

C. Finance Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to propose a budget to the Executive Committee and to suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. The Committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. This Committee shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer shall serve as ex-officio member of this committee.

D. Resolutions Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to receive all resolutions presented to the Association.

This Committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the annual Meeting. Officers of the Association, etc.

E. Time, Place and Preacher Committee composed of five (5) persons, whose duty will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational Meeting.

F. Missions Committee composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Chairman, Stewardship Chairman, and three (3) members at large, whose duty will be to assist the Director of Missions in the planning, promoting, and execution of Associational programs making recommendations to the Executive Committee.

G. Program Committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association whose duty shall be to receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Missions Committee Chairman, Director of Missions) draft and present the program, in printed form, for the sessions of the Association, which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business. The host pastors shall be included in this Committee.

H. Constitutional Committee shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes.

I. Social Services Committee shall be composed of one representative each of the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Homes for Aging and Baptist Hospital whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of these institutions.

TAR RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

J. Christian Education Committee shall be composed of a Christian Literature Representative, a Christian Education Representative, and one member at large whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

ARTICLE XI -- ORDAINING COUNCIL

In order to preserve the Baptist position with reference to the divine call to the ministry, and to recognize the responsibility of a local church to the entire Baptist denomination, the Association shall elect annually an ordaining council that may act in an advisory capacity for churches seeking its assistance. In setting up this Council and in its work, the following things are to be noted:

A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership and the request from the church come to the Association through the moderator or the Association Office.

B. That the church in which the candidate holds membership elect to the Council three members, one of them the pastor, provided he is not the candidate for ordination.

C. That the Tar River Association elect six members to constitute a standing ordaining council, to serve with the three members appointed by the local church, one of which shall be designated chairman by the Moderator. These shall serve terms of three years, and shall be ineligible to succeed themselves.

D. That the Council then proceed in the usual Baptist method and policy for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

E. That we encourage insofar as it is practical public ordination services.

F. That the Tar River Association furnish the minister thus set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry by this Council with credentials signed by the Moderator and Clerk of the Association and by each member of the Council.

ARTICLE XII -- VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XIII -- AMENDMENTS

This Constitution or the By-Laws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment (s) will be presented to afternoon session and voted on no earlier than evening session.

ARTICLE XIV -- PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert Rules of Order.

BY-LAWS

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.
5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.
6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.
7. All resolutions must be stated in writing and handed to the Clerk.
8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.
9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.
10. Reports of Committees on Convention objects must be brief - that on Missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.
11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.
12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to:

Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, N.C.
Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn.
State Baptist Convention.
13. The Clerk and Treasurer shall receive honorariums to be determined by the Executive Committee for their services as an expression of appreciation.
14. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

Executive Committee Report

The Executive Committee met for regular quarterly meetings:

December 17, 1979: Forty-eight were present representing 23 churches. The moderator informed the group of the death of Rev. Virgil E. Duncan, first missionary for the Tar River Association.

Twenty-six churches had agreed to participate in the World Missions Conference in May 1980.

The moderator presented to Dr. W.R. McCollum a gift for he and his wife from the Association, and a gift from the Pastors' Conference of a trade certificate from Hudson Belk.

The Missions Committee made two recommendations which were adopted. (1) Recommended the change of name for our bank savings fund to Contingency Fund. This would make no changes in monies but for name meaning only. (2) Recommended Rev. Lyman Wilson be presented a Certificate of Appreciation for his job as moderator.

The trustees recommended the gas heater in the pastorium be replaced with a gas heater having a pilot for safety purposes. The cost to be \$203.00.

A motion, by Rev. M.W. Shaw, that the trustees use their discretion in the price for the sale of the old heater was passed.

Mr. Richard Morgan made announcements concerning the Pastor/Deacon supper in March at Social Plains.

New pastors introduced were Rev. Jesse Mooney of Pilot and Rev. Raymond Hamrick of Cypress Chapel.

Mr. Seth Washburn reported 70 attended the M NIGHT program which was felt by all to be a success.

March 24, 1980: Forty-six were present representing 23 churches. The moderator presented to Rev. Lyman Wilson the Certificate of Appreciation for serving two years as moderator.

The moderator pointed out some of the five programs that had been held recently and what those had missed who had not attended. Examples were: the emphasis program on the 150 years of the Baptist State Convention at Pilot, the Evangelism Conference at Samaria, and the Youth Rally at Poplar Springs. He was encouraging attendance at these programs which are planned for us.

The moderator said he would appoint a Feasibility Committee to consider whether to write a history on the Tar River Association from the period the last one was written. This had been discussed at the meeting.

Dr. W.R. McCollum reported on plans for the World Missions Week May 4-11 in 24 churches in the Association. He needs some volunteers to fill responsibilities which resulted when some churches who had signed up to participate dropped out. He needs balance of monies to be paid in.

We will be asked to decide at the June meeting if we will participate in the World Missions program five years from now.

April 28 is set for a training session for Vacation Bible School workers.

Reported baptisms are making an upward trend.

Mr. Ray Pruette brought the report from the Missions Committee. They offered three recommendations that were passed. (1) that 7:30 p.m. be the starting time of all World Mission Conferences. (2) that minutes will be purchased at the precise cost of minutes. (3) that Mr. Maylon J. Frazier, treasurer, be authorized to use Contingency Fund for any needs, if any, by transferring it to the checking account.

Mr. Richard Morgan reported 128 attended the Pastor/Deacon supper at Social Plains. He reported some who were listed to go did not come which caused an indebtedness of \$11.00. If the churches who caused this does not send the money in, he made a motion that the \$11.00 be paid by the association. Motion passed.

New pastors introduced were Jerry Sosebee, Ransdell Chapel; Jimmy Lee Coyle, Samaria; and Mike Thompson, Duke Memorial.

HISTORY OF SANDY CREEK BAPTIST CHURCH

The history of Sandy Creek Baptist Church begins at an early year in the 1700's. The records show that as early as 1743, representatives were sent to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania to find out how they could begin an established church in this area. Following this, in 1755, according to records, the church was established. A day of prayer was observed.

The determination of the exact date for the origin of the church is difficult due to the fact that our history is so entwined with our mother church, Reedy Creek. William Walker, who became pastor of Reedy Creek in 1746, was also the first pastor of Sandy Creek, with services held twice a month.

The building for which a deed was issued to the Baptist Society of Sandy Creek on November 8, 1774, was located north of the present highway and east of the creek. The church was relocated at a later date on the property where our present buildings now stand. There have been two buildings which have housed the Sandy Creek church at this location. The first was located a few hundred feet to the north of our present sanctuary, which was constructed in the year 1896. The budget for the church in that year, which included the cost of construction was \$1,006.00.

The Associational Minutes for the year 1844 reports the membership of the church at 106 white members, 16 black members and having three baptisms.

This distinction is given to Elder William B. Worrell for the all-time record for baptisms for any one pastor. Elder Worrell baptized more than 350 into the church from 1826 until the time of his death in 1832. Dr. Thomas J. Taylor comments on this matter and cites the results of two meetings held by Elder Worrell. "At a meeting which Elder Worrell held in 1826, 76 were baptized and at another meeting, 72 were added to the church by baptism."

At this time in the 1880's, services were held on the third Sunday and the preceding Saturday. Church life during this period was serious business, and so were the testimonies of its members. The minutes reflect this seriousness when numerous members were disciplined for various breaches of Christian conduct. The minutes also record Christian concern for the erring members and efforts to restore them to the proper conduct as well as to forgive them when called upon to do so.

In 1954, the church called its first full-time pastor and immediately constructed a pastorium on the land given the church by G.B. West. Plans for construction of an Educational Building were begun in 1959 when a Building Fund was established. This building was completed in 1963 during the ministry of Rev. Dwane Campbell who served from 1961 to 1963. The pastorium was enlarged to its present size in 1966.

In April of 1972, after much prayer for ways to minister to the unchurched, the Bus Ministry was initiated. With God's leadership and a much-concerned people, we then needed a worship place for these. In August of 1974, the church voted to begin a Children's Church for ages 5 to 12. Volunteers to lead these services have meant much to the church and its spiritual growth.

In 1975, the pastor's salary was raised to \$10,000, which was a big jump for the church.

In June of 1976, one acre of land was given to the church in order to enlarge the cemetery by Jimmy Nelms. Soon, with God still leading the people, additional space was needed for the Educational Building. So, in September of 1976, the church voted to add about 1,000 square feet to the present building. Mrs. Rosa Aycock, at that time our oldest member, broke the ground for this addition. In January of 1977, the dedication of the new worship space with a baptistry was held.

The current membership is 439. Rev. Jake Mullins, our present pastor, was called in November of 1979. His present salary is \$16,000 and the church has a total budget for the year of 1980 of approximately \$53,000. The church also called Bobby Alston as Associate Pastor and Youth Director in January of 1980.

The talent and dedication of our membership has continued in physical and spiritual growth, which has marked Sandy Creek Baptist Church through the years as a dynamic church in this community.

History Of Centerville Baptist Church

Centerville Baptist Church was organized in 1914 under the leadership of the late George Coppedge. There were fourteen members received into the church the day the church was organized, but by the fall of 1914, when the church was received into the fellowship of the Tar River Baptist Association, seven more members had been added to the church roll. For the first eight to ten years, it was necessary for the congregation to use the Centerville Academy as a building for teaching and worship.

In 1923, a church building was begun on land donated to the church in 1918 by the late John Neal. This building was dedicated in 1926, but it never was adequate for the growing congregation, and by the mid-thirties plans were in the making for a new and adequate church building; but it was after the war, in 1948, that work was begun on the new building. This building was dedicated eight years later in 1956.

In the early sixties, land was purchased upon which a parsonage would be built. Work on the parsonage was begun in October 1967, and a year later our pastor, Brother Lyman Wilson, moved into it.

In writing the history of the Centerville Baptist Church, one becomes deeply aware of the adventurous leadership of our Lord, breathing His Spirit upon a humble people, giving them a mind to build, and a desire to see God's will done on earth as it is in heaven. We are proud of our past, and thank God for our rich heritage. We bless Him for sending us men with compassion and vision, and we would say today, with the writer of Hebrews, "Wherefore seeing we are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses...let us run with patience the race that is set before us."

Historical Review of Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church

Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church is located in Little River Township, Wake County, 6 miles north of Zebulon, NC. It was founded out of the community's deep need for a more spiritual acknowledgement of its devotion to God. What began as local prayer meetings became, on September 25, 1851, an organized church of 11 members.

Hopkins Chapel was named in honor of Joseph F. Hopkins, a charter member and the first church clerk. The first deacons were Matthew Williams and Littleton Privett. Other charter members were James Ferrell, Milly Gay, Lucinda Williams, Middie Williams, Christy Williams, William Ray, Ellen Privett and Mary Jones.

In 1852 Hopkins Chapel was admitted into the Central Association, with a membership of 14 and 50 cents in its treasury.

In its 129 year history, the church has been served by 23 pastors: M. Williams, M. Freeman (who served 2 terms totaling 12 years), W. Nowell, A. Purefoy, J. Booth, G. Coppedge, A. Pippin (who served two terms totaling 15 years), A. Setzer, C. Williams (whose 11 year term was the longest single term), J. Mitchiner, Raleigh Sherron, L. Evans, A. Parrish, Jimmie Atkins, Henry Morgan, Fred Crisp, Johnny Calswell, Virgil McBride, Edward Lehman, Claude Walker, Jim Tate, W.C. Barham and M.W. Shaw.

The church's first revival, held at about the time of the Civil War under Rev. Freeman, brought the church 32 new members, 3 of whom were black. Another revival, conducted by Rev. Parrish, brought 126 new members. In the 1930's, under Rev. Evans, 40 members were added in one year, 36 of them by baptism. Hopkins Chapel presently has 468 members.

The first building, a one-room log structure, stood on the site that is now the cemetery. During revivals, brush arbors were constructed to expand seating.

In 1888 a new white-framed building with greater seating capacity was erected. This was added on to several times to keep abreast of congregational growth. This new building was truly a venture in faith. When the church was struggling to pay off its debt, God came to its aid in the person of B.L. Strickland, who took over the note, giving the church extra time to meet its obligations. God intervened again when, on October 27, 1893, Hopkins Chapel was advertised for sale because of inability to liquidate debts. God's movement on the hearts of the community brought the generous response that paid the church's debt.

Forward-looking and progressive-minded since its inception, Hopkins Chapel erected yet another building in 1957. Several additions have since been made, and the purchase of audio equipment has enhanced the church's worship and ministry. In 1963 the present parsonage was erected.

Hopkins Chapel has always been a Missionary Baptist Church, believing strongly that the Great Commission is a command of God that should be obeyed. In 1970 this conviction was given significant recognition when the church approved a budget pledging 17 cents of each budgeted dollar to causes outside of the church itself (13 cents to Cooperate Program cause and 4 cents to the Association). Thus, increasing individual stewardship has made possible larger gifts to missions each year.

In the early 1970's Hopkins Chapel decided to leave the Raleigh Association and unite with the Tar River Association. As hoped, this change has made possible greater progress and ministry to the glory of God. To enhance community ministry, a church secretary was hired in September of 1973.

Hopkins Chapel has been used to aid many fire pastors who are now serving the Master's cause around the world. Several church members have also been called into fulltime ministry.

Hopkins Chapel is continually searching for improved ways to glorify God. We are prayerfully considering additional church space and an expanded church staff to meet the needs of our growing community. But we are determined that these shall be accomplished without cutting mission gifts.

In our 129 year history many dedicated Christians have made possible the wonderful happenings at Hopkins Chapel. We are confident that each of these will be duly noted and rewarded when we stand before the Master. We are rightfully proud of our heritage, but like our founders we cannot be satisfied unless every effort has been exhausted to reach the lost. Though thankful for our material blessings, our greatest joy is seeing souls coming to Christ, and serving the Master in their giving, time and talent.

A Brief History of Union Chapel Baptist Church

As we explore the history of Union Chapel Baptist Church, we explore more than just mere facts, we discover a part of ourselves and our community as it has been used by God as an instrument for the spreading of the "Good News". This brief history does little to give proper recognition to those who have strove to make another stronghold for the Gospel to be preached.

The idea for our church was born in the mind of a concerned school teacher, Miss Nellie Robertson, who saw the need for a Sunday School in the local community. Miss Robertson and Miss Volcie Mitchell, a pupil, joined together and wrote invitations to each family in the community and requested them to come to the schoolhouse on Sunday, February 10, 1910 at 2:30, to discuss and help organize a Sunday School for the community. The meeting was very successful and the following people were elected to be the first officers of the Sunday School: superintendent, Robert Clark; secretary, Miss Mamie Robertson; teachers, Nellie Robertson and Mrs. Lillie Grissom. Twenty-four people came to the first gathering and an offering of twenty-five cents was received and used for the purchase of hymn books. Some of those who attended this first gathering are: the Wiley Bunns, the W.P. Robertsons, the Gus Hicks, the W.R. Bobbitts, Mack Hopkins, Marjorie Mitchell, Miss Jo Hopkins, Miss Ella Grace Mitchell, Mrs. Vera Rhodes, and Buck Richards.

Attendance grew to the point that the people felt that they needed a church building. Bet Ferrell gave an acre of land and Buck Richards, W.R. Bobbitt and Kearney Faison helped to cut the first logs. The church building was dedicated in the fall of 1911 and named Union Chapel because the people felt they were united together in Christian love and fellowship.

Rev. John Sledge was called as the first pastor. He helped begin the organizing process during the young church's life. Some of the pastors that served during the early years of the church were: Raleigh Sherron, Theo Davis, Charlie Gray, C.H. Caswell, A.D. Parrish, and Mr. Stancil. These served well and soon the people decided that there was a need for more room and two classrooms were added to the building. Some of the first superintendents were: Hubert Eddins, Mr. Knott, Will Clark, Bill Hopkins, and Thornton Puryear.

Some of the history will be incomplete after this point due to a fire that destroyed some of the records. This fire happened several years ago.

The years of the depression humbled many hearts and many received Christ into their hearts, but when prosperity returned, many turned away from the fellowship of the church. Attendance fell so that only Mrs. Bernard Mitchell and her mother, Mrs. Lillie Grissom were the only ones who continued to come. Soon even these two became discouraged and ceased to attend. In 1941, Mr. Zollie Woodlief, Mrs. Grissom (deaconess), and Rev. A.W. Icard sponsored a two-week revival with Rev. Icard as the speaker. Many of the members began to return to the church.

Some other pastors that served during the forties were: H.E. Cherry, Victor Dowd, and Vivian Evans.

In the fall of 1951, John Parker was called as pastor. During Rev. Parker's leadership, the church membership doubled.

Tommy Ellington was called as pastor in November of 1954 and after his resignation in June of 1957, E.M. Rhiner was called. Rev. Rhiner served one year and George Stallings was called. Rev. Stallings led the church in many new adventures. During his service, a fellowship hall was built, the Brotherhood Society,

the Girls' Auxiliary, and the Royal Ambassadors were established, a piano for the women's class was purchased, and land was bought from Venton Ferrell for the site of a parsonage. Rev. Stallings resigned on June 11, 1961.

Rev. Ward was called as pastor in August of 1961. The church celebrated its fiftieth anniversary on December 10, 1961. The parsonage was built during Rev. Ward's service and completed in March of 1962 at a cost of \$12,785.03. Rev. Ward resigned in May of 1963.

Richard Austin was called as pastor and began on July 28, 1963. In 1964, the church library was organized with Mrs. Bobby Creech as librarian and Mrs. Elton Massey and Mrs. Geraldine Morris as her assistants. Rev. Austin resigned on November 30, 1964.

Rev. William Stanley was called in January of 1965. The church grew spiritually under his leadership. He resigned on June 11, 1967.

On June 18, 1967, Rev. James Jackson became pastor. During his leadership, the final payment on the parsonage was made on October 9, 1969. On November 9, 1969, the church voted to withdraw from the Raleigh Association and join the Tar River Association. Rev. Jackson resigned on March 15, 1970.

On June 15, 1970, E.L. Taylor came as pastor. On February 9, 1971, land was purchased from Mr. Virgie Gay for the purpose of building a new sanctuary. The plans for the new sanctuary were approved on August 5, 1973. Ground breaking ceremonies took place with the following participating: Floyd Edwards (contractor), Mamie Mitchell (oldest charter member), Marjorie Mitchell (faithful charter member), Donald Richards, Lee Naylor, Teresa Cunningham, and Brian Leffingwell represented the church's future generation. The last service that was held in the old church was held on September 29, 1974 and the first service in the new church was held on October 13, 1974. Rev. Taylor resigned soon after this.

Since the building of the new sanctuary, Rev. Steve Sells and George Stallings, Jr. have served as pastors.

The church's present pastor is Kenneth Stalls. Rev. Stalls began as pastor on August 12, 1979. Since he has been pastor, the debt for the church van has been paid off and the starting of a youth program and the hiring of a youth minister has been established. We anticipate many new horizons in the future as we strive to follow our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

W.M.U REPORT

This year, Tar River W.M.U. has really been teaching bold missions. The ten council members have again achieved the advanced W.M.U. Achievement Award. The work the council members have done has been both bold and excellent. We had six directors attend Mundo Vista for the leadership workshop in September. On September 29th, the leadership workshop was held at Peachtree Church.

Our Baptist Women had a successful prayer retreat at White Level with 125 attending, led by Mrs. Lynn Warren. Baptist Young Women, led by Elaine Lewis had a good activity at Pilot. Acteen activity, led Nanette Warren was very successful.

G.A.'s had both a very good activity, also GA camp for Tar River GA's. This again was even better than last year. We had people from our church helping the counselors. We had more to attend this year. This camp was well planned by the GA director, Miriam Barrinber and her assistants Linda Hicks and Nanette Warren. We are grateful to all our directors for such a wonderful year.

Mission Friends, led by Sandra Hough has organized new Mission Friends in our churches this year. We feel this is one of our greatest age-level groups because we know when Mission Friends is started in a church, we then have W.M.U. work at its beginning. Mission Friends activity was a very successful day camp. Also, our Mission Friends leader started a quarterly newsletter that was great.

On March 31, 1980, the W.M.U. annual associational meeting was held at Ephesus church with Spring Hope assisting with a delicious meal. We had 151 attending. The guest speaker for the afternoon was Mrs. Ralph Harrell, missionary to Kenya. Special music was rendered by Mrs. Betty Lane Bissette. The speaker for the evening session was Miss Nona Kay Bickerstaff, State Baptist Young Women's director. Special music was rendered by the Operatunity singers.

We now have W.M.U. work in all 43 churches.

SUNDAY SCHOOL — V.B.S. REPORT

The work of the Sunday School (Bible Study Program) is to get people into Bible study. The work of the Sunday School is to lead people to accept Christ as Lord and Saviour and join His church. The work of the Sunday School is to lead people to live the truths of God's word daily in their lives. The work of the Sunday School is to help people understand and participate in the work of the church and the denomination. Now if we accept these tasks as being valid Biblical concepts, then we have a tremendous challenge before us through the Bible study program (Sunday School) of our churches.

The Sunday Schools of Tar River have been on the decline overall for the last several years. However, during the latter part of this year, there are indications that this decline is being halted and in some cases turned around. The latest reports from some of our Sunday Schools show a marked increase both in quantity of people and quality of teaching and learning.

Many of our Sunday Schools have gotten serious about outreach. Visitation has been started and attendance has increased. It always will.

We have an involved and active ASSIST Team which received three days of intense training at Ridgecrest in April. Some of these same team members were also trained at Burlington in a one-day clinic for Vacation Bible School teacher training in March. This team also conducted an Associational-wide Sunday School Director and Teacher Improvement Conference at Flat Rock in September. One hundred and ten people attended this conference. ASSIST stands for Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team. It is made up of age-group leaders trained to help teachers and leaders in their own local church situation. There are leaders for Pre-school, Children, Youth, Young and Middle Adults, Older Adults, and Directors and General Officers. The most exciting thing about this team and the ASSIST concept is the availability of the team or any part of the team to come to the local church in a one-in-one session dealing with the specific needs of that church's Sunday School. In this way, the team can be effective in helping improve and enlarge a Sunday School by dealing with that specific Sunday School by itself. The ASSIST Team has already been invited to five individual churches for this purpose and we are hoping for many more in 1980-81.

Our Vacation Bible School Clinic was held at Harris Chapel this year and the participation and attendance were the best we have had. As a result of this, we had some excellent V.B.S. sessions across our Association. Many of our schools reported finding many prospects for the church's Sunday Schools and from this we feel Sunday Schools will experience new growth.

A new intensity in interest concerning Sunday School quality and quantity is much in evidence across Tar River. We hope with God's power we can help the Bible Study program of our churches in the most effective ways possible during this coming year.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

June 16, 1980: Twenty were present representing nine churches.

The treasurer's report showed a checking balance of \$816.63 and adding contingency fund of \$4,239.73 gives a total of \$5,056.36 on hand.

The moderator appointed a Feasibility Committee to study the writing of a history of Tar River Association from 1922 to 1980. Appointed were: Mr. Richard Morgan, chairman, with Dr. W.R. McCollum, Mrs. Willis Warren, Mrs. William Ricks, and Rev. John Attaway.

Dr. W.R. McCollum had reported the Executive Committee in June would be asked to participate in a World Missions week in 1986. Because of low attendance, the vote was postponed until the September meeting.

Dr. W.R. McCollum reported the Home Mission Board had invited him to participate in a preaching mission to Alaska through and by his Association. The Missions Committee recommended he be allowed to participate if monies could be found to send him. A motion was passed "that because of financial conditions, we say no to sending the Director of Missions.

Rev. Jack Sammons reported there would be an Associational ASSIST team to help if needed in Sunday School, available after September.

Rev. Allen C. Allen, chairman of Ordaining Council reported Rev. Raymond Hamrick had been ordained.

Mr. Richard Morgan introduced an idea of having deacons meet as do the pastors in the Association.

September 22, 1980: Ninety-eight were present representing 40 churches.

The treasurer's report showed a total on hand of \$6,191.49 including checking and contingency funds.

The moderator asked the Feasibility Committee to have a report by January 1, 1981 on the writing of a Tar River Association history.

The moderator reported a deacon's group would be formed, to be called Tar River Deacons Association.

Dr. McCollum stated he had free films on State Missions available to the churches.

The proposed budget for 1981 was presented and adopted to be presented to the Association at the fall session.

The recommendations were presented and passed to present to Mrs. Willis R. Warren and Mr. Maylon J. Frazier, certificates of appreciation at the annual session of the Association at Hopkins Chapel on October 20.

The Calendar of Events from the Missions Committee was adopted with one addition of June 1 for Pastors' Conference.

The Missions Committee offered a recommendation that the Association participate in a World Missions Conference in late May of 1986 which was adopted.

The printed report of the activities of the Director of Missions was presented and the statistics of the May 4-11, 1980 World Missions Conference.

The Director of Missions presented information he had from the Baptist State Convention of an opportunity for Tar River Association to participate in a 1982 Joint Evangelistic Crusade with simultaneous revivals of the Baptist State Convention and the General Baptist State Convention of N.C., Inc.

A motion was passed that we get the feelings of our churches and be prepared to vote on this at the December meeting.

ANNUITY REPORT

The Southern Baptist Retirement Program is the denomination's retirement program for churches and agencies to use to provide for their paid personnel. It is a money accumulation program which is flexible, gives a choice of funds, provides high earnings, various benefit options, and is portable from one denominational employer to another. It builds an annuity value to provide benefits for the member and/or beneficiary through the Annuity Board in the event of disability, death, or retirement. The Southern Baptist Retirement Program protects the church and the employee by filling a financial void created by death, disability, or retirement. The Southern Baptist Retirement Program protects the church and the employee by filling a financial void created by death, disability, or retirement. When adequate contributions to the program have been made, the financial need is met, freeing the church to move on in its mission. Both the church and its personnel are protected by traveling Route 10. It helps to build a direct avenue to financial security in retirement. The word "ROUTE" heralds the Southern Baptist Retirement Program as the way for Southern Baptists to go in building adequate retirement benefits for employees. "TEN" attests to the foundation of the program: that the church

contribute, as a minimum, an amount equal to 10% of an employee's total compensation. This projects the Annuity Board's prescription for economic ills which hamper persons who seriously want to plan ahead. When the church places its personnel on "ROUTE TEN", it can be assured that the final destination is more adequate retirement income. The church can also be confident that the protection for these families against premature death or disability is readily available along the way. Retirement planning can be puzzling. Questions like how to plan, how much money to lay aside monthly, and when to retire are difficult. Through the Southern Baptist Retirement Program, the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention can help answer such questions and help church personnel plan for retirement. Lesser amounts than 10 per cent are inadequate to help insure your financial security....in times like these....

Inflation. Wage-price guidelines. Consumer price spirals. We could go on; but we think you know what we mean. These are trying times, to say the least. They're times for thought....for planning. They're times when you should take a close look at your retirement program.

Who is eligible to participate in the program? Anyone in a paid position of a Southern Baptist church which cooperates with a state convention of Southern Baptist churches can be enrolled by the church in the retirement section of the program. The Retirement Program is available for: church secretaries, associate pastors, Ministers of youth, adult, children, music, etc., Day Care staff, custodial staff, and pastors.

When should the church enroll personnel? The church should enroll an employee when he/she becomes a regular paid employee of the church. To delay, reduces the potential benefit which can be accrued by early enrollment. Immediately upon employment, the church should enroll the staff member in the retirement program. To delay is COSTLY! This should be a part of the "calling" process!!!

In the Tar River Association 35 churches and 35 staff members are participating in the retirement program. Of this number 16 are still participating on the minimum of \$33.34 per month. There is a great need to upgrade this to 10% of total salary for staff members. If you have already planned your church budget for 1980-1981, and have not taken into prayerful consideration at all, a retirement program for your pastor, we urge you to do so as soon as possible. For the scripture says, "You shall not muzzle an ox when it is treading out the grain" and "The laborer deserves his wages." (1 Timothy 5:18)
