Constitution

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II — PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

ARTICLE III — MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet biannually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring season

ARTICLE IV — RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V — DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; messengers; give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter, these to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches, and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or church letter at more

than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII - OFFICERS

The officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer (with the privilege of combining the office of Clerk and Treasurer), Auditor, Historian, Trustees, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Stewardship Chairman, Chairman of the Social Services Committee, and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee. The Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Clerk, the Historian, the Trustees, the Chairman of the Social Services Committee and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence at the conclusion of the session. The Treasurer and the Auditor shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence on January 1. The Sunday School Director, the Church Training Director, the Music Director, the Chairman of Evangelism and the Stewardship Chairman are to be elected in the spring meeting of the association and their terms of office shall commence upon election. The above officers shall be elected annually. At such times as the Association shall elect a Director of Missions, he becomes an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII — DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, to enforce the rules, to preserve order, and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also serve as ex officio chairman of the Executive Committee of the Association. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, to serve as Vice Chairman of the Executive Committee and to serve as Chairman of the Missions Committee.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the body, and use all diligence in having same printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible, to mail the church clerks reminders by church letters forthcoming and to keep on hand the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body. He shall also serve as ex officio secretary of the Executive Committee.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse the monies contributed for the expenses of the body as authorized by the Executive Body.

E. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and report to the Association annually.

F. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and to report at the annual session of the Association.

G. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to respond, within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Association.

H. It shall be the duty of the Associational Church Training Director to promote the interests of Church Training within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

I. It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Director to promote the interests of the Sunday Schools within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

J. It shall be the duty of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director to promote the interests of the Woman's Missionary Union within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished. This officer's election may be a confirmation of election by the Associational Woman's Missionary Union.

K. It shall be the duty of the Associational Brotherhood Director to promote interests of the Brotherhood within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

L. The Associational Music Director shall plan and direct the music for all meetings of the Association and its Executive Committee and shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music in the churches of the Association.

M. Three (3) Trustees shall be elected from the membership of the Association to hold title of all property of the Association, to act under the direction of the Association through its Executive Committee to execute necessary legal documents, and to supervise the maintenance of all property belonging to the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive by purchase, gift or otherwise title to real and personal property and to see, convey or mortgage same for the use and benefit of said Association and its officers and agents upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of said Tar River Association.

The Trustees shall also be responsible for and keep an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association. An additional copy of this inventory shall be filed with the Treasurer and at the Associational office.

Trustees are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

N. It shall be the duty of the Associational Stewardship Chairman to both encourage and keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the stewardship of the total Christian life and witness. He shall make an annual progress report to the Association.

O. The Moderator shall appoint the Parliamentarian at each session of the Association and/or Executive Committee meeting.

ARTICLE IX — EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Associational officers as set forth in Article VII, Director of Missions, Moderator for the past year, along with key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Committee members shall be members of the church they represent. If your church does not have all these leaders, you may appoint a representative for a committee prior to the regular Fall Annual Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Directors of Missions is an ex officio member of the Executive Committee and does not have the power to vote.

C. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

- 1. The Executive Committee of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary and to define his duties.
- 2. To act for the Association between regular sessions of the body.
- 3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.
- 4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
- 5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the annual budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.
- 6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Committee in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

ARTICLE X — OTHER COMMITTEES

The following committees whose duties are prescribed below shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new committee will take office.

A. NOMINATING COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to nominate the members of the various committees and chairmen and Associational officers deemed necessary to facilitate the work of the Association. The Nominating Committee will be appointed hereafter by the Moderator of the Association. This committee shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to provide the Association with authority for operation to determine the extent of the powers of the Association and to examine Articles of Faith and recommend the admission of new churches to the Association. It is the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association by badges as voting members of the Association.

C. FINANCE COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to propose a budget to the Executive Committee and to suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. The committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. This committee shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as ex officio member of this committee.

D. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to receive all resolutions presented to the Association.

This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting, officers of the Association, etc.

E. TIME, PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational meeting.

F. MISSIONS COMMITTEE composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Chairman, Stewardship Chairman, and three (3) members at large, whose duty will be to assist the Director of Missions in the planning, promoting, and execution of Associational programs, making recommendations to the Executive Committee. G. PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association whose duty shall be to receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Missions Committee Chairman, Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form, for the sessions of the Association, which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business. The host pastors shall be included in this committee.

H. CONSTITUTIONAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes.

I. SOCIAL SERVICES COMMITTEE shall be composed of one representative each of the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Homes for Aging and Baptist Hospital whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of these institutions.

J. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of a Christian Literature representative, a Christian Education representative, and one member at large whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

ARTICLE XI - ORDAINING COUNCIL

In order to preserve the Baptist position with reference to the divine call to the ministry, and to recognize the responsibility of a local church to the entire Baptist denomination, the Association shall elect annually an ordaining council that may act in an advisory capacity for churches seeking its assistance. In setting up this council and in its work, the following things are to be noted:

A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership and the request from the church come to the Association through the Moderator or the Association office.

B. That the church in which the candidate holds membership elect to the council three members, one of them the pastor, provided he is not the candidate for ordination.

C. That the Tar River Association elect six members to constitute a standing ordaining council, to serve with the three members appointed by the local church, one of which shall be designated chairman by the Moderator. These shall serve terms of three years, and shall be ineligible to succeed themselves.

D. That the council then proceed in the usual Baptist method and policy for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

E. That we encourage insofar as it is practical public ordination services.

F. That the Tar River Association furnish the minister thus set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry by this council with credentials signed by the Moderator and Clerk of the Association and by each member of the Council.

ARTICLE XII – VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XIII — AMENDMENTS

This Constitution of the Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment(s) will be presented to afternoon session and voted on no earlier than evening session.

ARTICLE XIV — PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

Bvlaws

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with praver.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. Any resolution to be presented to the Executive Committee and/or semiannual Associational Meetings, must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Association and published in the Associational newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.

10. Reports of committees on Convention objects must be brief - that on missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

13. The Clerk and Treasurer shall receive honorariums to be determined by the Executive Committee for their services as an expression of appreciation.

14. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

AFTERNOON SESSION THEME: Found Faithful

(Note from Clerk: Reports are not printed in the Proceedings. The reports are placed in this annual following the Proceedings.)

1. The 156th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by Rev. Gary Anderson, moderator.

2. Mrs. Sandra Wood led the opening hymn, "Trust and Obey."

3. Rev. Grady Edwards, pastor of Maple Springs Baptist Church, read from I Corinthians 4:1-5 and led the group in prayer.

4. The moderator reminded the messengers that the meeting would be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order* and that only duly elected messengers or alternates would be eligible to vote. Mr. Epp Cattlet was appointed to serve as parliamentarian.

5. Mrs. Agnes Merritt presented the report from the Program Committee.

6. The new pastors were presented to the group: Rev. Kenneth Ashley, White Level Church; Rev. Raleigh Carroll, Pearce; and Rev. David Moore, Philadelphia.

7. The histories of the host churches were read by Rev. Raleigh Carroll, Pearce Baptist Church, and Mrs. Margaret Holmes, Poplar Springs Baptist Church.

8. Mrs. Sandra Wood led the group in singing "Make Me A Blessing."

9. The Retirement Homes Report was presented by David Moore as printed. Report passed.

10. The Baptist Hospital Report was presented by Danny Benfield as printed. Report passed.

11. The Children's Homes Report was presented by the moderator as printed. Report passed.

12. The Annuity Board Report was presented by the moderator as printed. Report passed.

13. Rev. Jimmy Pulliam, pastor, Rock Springs Baptist Church, brought the message for the afternoon session centered around our theme. Scripture came from Luke 9:62.

14. Mrs. Sandra Wood led the group in singing "I Am Thine, O Lord."

15. Rev. Gary Anderson led the group into the business session.

- 16. There was no old business.
- 17. New business not on agenda.
 - a. Rev. Gary Anderson presented a certificate of appreciation to Mrs. Sandra Wood and Mr. Van Denton.
- 18. New Business on agenda.
 - a. The Nominating Committee Report was presented by Mr. S. P. Scott with one change in Church Training director. Rev. Victor Blackwell will serve in this position instead of the one printed.

b. The Treasurer's Report was presented by Maylon Frazier and passed without

discussion. He asked the group to note that the Sims Mission is now contributing to our Association and that expenses exceed our income.

c. The Auditor's Report was presented by the moderator and passed.

d. The Executive Committee Report was presented as printed and passed.

e. The Missions Committee Report was presented by Mrs. Agnes Merritt and passed. Rev. Gary Anderson brought the group up to date on the case pending against Tar River Association. We are still hopeful this case will not go to court.

19. Mrs. Sandra Wood opened the worship period by leading the group in singing "The Old Rugged Cross." Before the song, Sandra expressed her appreciation to the Association for the privilege of serving the Association as music director for the past five years.

20. Special music was also presented by Mrs. Sandra Wood.

21. Dr. W. R. McCollum, our Director of Missions, brought the annual sermon on "God's Magnificant Minority." His text was Mark 4:3-9.

22. Following a prayer of thanksgiving, the session adjourned for the evening meal.

23. The evening session began at 7:30 p.m. with Rev. Gary Anderson presiding. The group sang "He Leadeth Me."

24. Rev. Jim Loftis, Flat Rock Baptist Church, read scripture and led the opening prayer.

25. Mr. Joe Savage presented the Resolutions Committee Report as follows:

The Resolutions Committee expresses their appreciation to the Pearce Baptist Church and the Poplar Springs Baptist Church for being such gracious hosts for this meeting and for the delicious meal. Special thanks was extended to those providing the messages and the special music.

26. Mr. Gilford Bufkin presented the following report from the Credentials Committee: 37 churches represented; 105 messengers, 14 alternates, 28 pastors, 13 associational officers, and 24 guests, totaling 221 in attendance.

27. Special music was presented by the Pilot Baptist Church Choir.

28. The evening message was brought by Dr. Roy J. Smith, Executive Secretary, Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. The scripture came from I Corinthians 4:1-2 and his message centered around our theme, "Found Faithful."

29. Following the message, the benediction was given by Rev. David Huggins. The session was adjourned.

Brief History of Pearce Baptist Church

Following a revival meeting held at the old Pearce schoolhouse in the spring of 1915, the Pearce Aminy Baptist Church was organized.

W. D. Harrington and C. T. Plyborn conducted this meeting and led in the organization of the church on April 15, 1915. Sixty-nine members transferred their membership from the Poplar Springs Church. Mr. Harrington was called as pastor May 9, 1915, and served until July 1, 1916.

Wallace Hartsell served from September 1, 1916, until January 27, 1917, succeeded by D. T. Bunn who led in the construction of the new church which was completed in 1918. November 17 the name Aminy was dropped and the present name adopted.

J. F. Mitchiner came in 1919 and served until 1929.

Charles B. Howard served from 1930 until July 9, 1933. He gave one-fourth of his salary to missions.

Homer O. Baker came September 10, 1933, and served until December 31, 1939.

Church roll was purged, board of deacons was reogranized, unified budget and every member canvas was adopted.

A storm nearly tore the church off the foundation in 1936 and plans were made in September of that year to erect a new church which was completed in 1939. Mr. Baker's last sermon was the last Sunday in December 1939, the day the church was dedicated free of debt.

W. Paul Childress was called as May 1940 and served until October 1942. The church voted to join Central Association in 1945.

Mark Osburn served from February 7, 1943, until May 1945.

Albert S. Lamm was invited to hold a meeting in July 1945 after which he was called as pastor. He served from September 1945 until October 1946.

W. C. Blue was called January 1947 and served until August 1948.

Albert Lamm accepted a call for a second time March 15, 1949. The church added a balcony and vestibule, painted interior, renovated the choir loft, put a new top on the church, installed bathrooms and etc. Mr. Lamm resigned July 15, 1953, urging Pearce to go full-time.

C. L. Capps was called October 1953 on a full-time basis. October 1, 1953, Homecoming Day, \$2,000.00 was raised to build a pastorium. The lot was given by Jeff Pearce and family, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Perry, Sr. gave the brick and several members donated labor. Mr. Capps resigned May 1955. John Andes was supply pastor until August 1955.

Warren E. Kerr served October 1955 until March 31, 1959. School property was acquired and a kitchen, ladies lounge, and nursery was installed. We joined Tar River Association.

Garland L. Foushee was called May 19, 1959, and resigned December 31, 1963. Major remodeling of the annex was completed. A breezeway connecting the church and annex was built in memory of J. W. Perry, Sr. Training Union and an athletic program was begun under his tenure.

Elmer L. Joyner served from June 1, 1964, until December 1967. There was strong growth in Training Union, WMU, RA, and GA programs. We celebrated our 50th anniversary on October 17, 1965 with Homer O. Baker as guest speaker.

C. W. Driver was called January 1968 and resigned December 1971. He led us to pay the debt on the annex and fulfill a five point program of improvement to church property. At this time the children of Frances C. Perry established a scholarship fund in her memory.

Jackie Bryant was interim pastor.

L. Clay Cook served from May 1972 until July 1974. We served as host church for the Lay Evangelism School with five churches participating, purchased new doors for the sanctuary and made a pictorial directory.

Dr. Elmo B. Scoggins served as interim pastor from July 1974 until March 1975.

Walter Hill, Jr. was pastor from March 1975 until May 1976.

C. W. Driver assumed pastorate for the second time August 22, 1976. Constitution and Bylaws were adopted, and the baptistry was installed with the painting donated by L. D. and Inez Pearce. Memorial stained windows, pews upholstered, carpet installed, sanctuary painted and many improvements to the church property were completed. January 1984 Sandra Hough was called to be adult choir leader and youth worker. June 30, 1985, C. W. Driver resigned effective August 1, 1985.

William Poole assumed duties as interim pastor August 1, 1985, and served until February 23, 1986.

Our present pastor, Raleigh Carroll, assumed duties March 27, 1986.

There have been four ordained ministers to come from this fellowship. Roy J. Smith,

Johnny J. Smith, Coy Jeans, Jr., and Ronald S. Pierce. Eddie Hinton was also licensed to preach in 1985. God has truly blessed us! We look forward to the future years with great anticipation as God leads us.

Brief History of Poplar Springs Baptist Church

At the time in history when a group of 13 colonies was struggling to establish its independence from Britain, and before North Carolina had become a state in the new nation, a small group of farmers met under a bush arbor located a few hundred yards from Norris Creek and established Poplar Springs Church. The Poplar Springs Meeting House was so named because of the cool clear water that trickled from the hillside and flowed into Norris Creek, and the many poplar trees that surrounded the spring. This place soon became the center of religious activities for a large area encompassing the communities, as we know them today, of Pilot, Pine Ridge, Bunn, and Pearce.

By the early 1900s the population of the surrounding communities had grown so much that the members began to break away from Poplar Springs and formed churches in the communities of Pilot, Bunn, Pearce, and later, Pine Ridge. This left such a small membership that for year there were only six to ten families supporting the church. In 1975 there was a membership of 157 with about 110 resident members. Today, the membership is 188, resident and non-resident.

World War II was a turning point in the history of the church. The use-to-be farmer got out into the work world, saw the sights of the city, and felt more greenbacks in his pocket than ever before. One of the ways he could change his community was to improve his church.

Four young girls from our church at this time gave the beautiful pulpit furniture which we enjoy today. Thus, the pulpit furniture was the beginning of a renovation program that has been going on for 30 years.

In 1948-49 four classrooms were constructed. During 1949 and 1950 renovation of the sanctuary became the real push. Additional classrooms were added to the back of the church in the late 1950s, and restrooms were installed in 1964-65. In 1959 land was given to the church for a parsonage. The note on the parsonage was burned in 1961.

In 1978 we centered our attention on constructing a fellowship hall and a kitchen that would take care of our social needs. The most recent additions have been a spring cover and the lights out front that light the church at night.

The WMU has been a dynamic and contributing force in the history of Poplar Springs Church. We do not know the exact date that it was organized, but we do know that it was functioning in the early 1920s. It was the WMU that was responsible for getting electricity in the church. Functions of the WMU have really grown. We now have an active Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, GA's, and Missions Friends organizations. All of the above-mentioned organizations meet once a month, and they are reaching out to different areas in our church and community.

Poplar Springs has an XYZ Club which consists of the senior members of our church and community. We feel that this organization is one of our important ministries. They have been active since 1977, and they meet once a month for a planned program and some type of brunch or a meal. They have also taken several trips together. Our BYW has been visiting the nursing home in Zebulon at least once a month and also the senior citizens in our church and community. This has proved to be a very worthwhile ministry to our members as well as our senior citizens. The GA's and Mission Friends have a very worthwhile and special ministry establishing the youth in our church and community to reach out to each other and take a positive stand in their lives because they are the future of our church.

From 1788 to the present time, Poplar Springs Church has held an important place of influence in this area of the county. It is proud of its age and Christian leadership.

Poplar Springs has grown smaller in membership by giving of itself. It became the mother church of Bunn, Pilot, Pearce, and Pine Ridge, all of which are larger than Poplar Springs. Through the years, the church has been concerned with matters of doctrine and theology. It has attempted to serve the needs of its members through concern and love.

What we are today, we have been becoming for 193 years. We can trace our concern for the Gospel, our love and concern for others, and our determination for the future to definite events in our history.

Baptist Retirement Homes Report

North Carolina Baptists have been ministering to older adults through the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina for over 34 years. These homes provide a home and hope for older adults.

The following paragraphs will give an overview of some of the happenings of the retirement homes in 1984-1985.

The retirement homes had an average daily occupancy of 244 residents. Thirty-one new residents were admitted to the homes and nursing care. Over \$100,000 of benevolent care was provided monthly to home residents. Sixty cents of each benevolent care dollar was provided through the Cooperative Program and North Carolina Mission Offering gifts.

The homes' nursing care unit, Winston-Salem, can now care for 85 persons. The nursing care unit is operating at a 95 percent plus occupancy.

Plans are being formulated to build another duplex unit on the Hayes Home Campus. A 20 minute video tape, "Not an Ordinary Person," has been produced to be used in communicating the retirement homes' ministry. The tape will be available on 16 mm film.

The fiscal year closed in the black, largely due to special gifts. The Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina feel their most important dimension to meeting the needs of the older adults is Christian compassion. Thanks to your mission support, care beyond the minimum requirement can be given.

North Carolina Baptist Hospital Report

North Carolina Baptist Hospital began more than 60 years ago as a missionary ministry of the Baptist State Convention. From a modest 80-bed community hospital it has grown to a 701-bed facility serving the region and the nation while also becoming the principal teaching hospital of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine.

As North Carolina Baptists we help support the work done at Baptist Hospital through our giving to the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering. In 1985 Baptists in North Carolina gave close to \$1 million dollars through these two channels.

The amount of \$566,307.24 was given through the Cooperative Program. This money supports the Department of Pastoral Care which provides many services such as: a

pastoral ministry to patients and their family members; a program of clinical-pastoral education; human enrichment events such as marriage enrichment retreats, personal growth seminars, etc. for ministers and lay people; pastoral counseling for individuals, families, and groups; satellite centers in Fayetteville, Morganton, Charlotte, and Asheville which provide counseling services and educational opportunities for people in various areas of the state.

The North Carolina Missions Offering brought in \$374,237.77 to our hospital. These funds are used to assist those persons who need the care of Baptist Hospital and do not have personal resources, adequate hospital insurance, or sponsorship of a government agency.

We are fortunate to have a Baptist Hospital that is part of a major academic medical center and which is concerned with the patient's physical, psychological and spiritual welfare. May we continue to support it financially and prayerfully.

The Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc. Report

The purpose of the Baptist Children's Homes is to care for dependent, neglected, and homeless children, unwed mothers and their children, and the rendering of related services to relatives; to work with other agencies, institutions, and programs in an effort toward the preservation, conservation, and rehabilitation of families, hoping to avoid the necessity of placing children away from their own homes. Services available include institutional group care, group home care, foster family care, crisis intervention, financial assistance, emergency care, therapeutic camping, and maternity care.

During the Baptist State Convention in Charlotte, November 11-13, 1985, messengers voted to allow a new and different offering to be received for the Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Hospital, and Baptist Retirement Homes. This offering to be called the Homes and Hospital Offering and the State Missions Offering in September will replace the North Carolina Missions Offering. It is suggested that the Homes and Hospital Offering be received during the month of May. The goal for this year's offering is \$1.6 million of which the Baptist Children's Homes will receive 50 percent of the receipts.

Trustees of the Baptist Children's Homes have recently announced plans for the 1985-86 Building Children's Hope Fund. This is a new plan of financial involvement through investment by individuals, corporations, and foundations. The Broyhill Foundation has also issued the Broyhill Challenge. This is a plan to provide a 25 percent supplement to every unrestricted, individual gift to the Baptist Children's Homes. Thus, if you give \$100 the foundation will give \$25. This challenge will go through September 30, 1986.

The reason for this concern is that the current participation rates are from \$400.00 to 10 percent. On the lower rates a pastor will retire on \$1,500.00 yearly. This has caused many pastors, who have served admirably, to live at poverty levels.

The Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention feels this to be a sad commentary on churches and therefore recommends that our churches consider the higher level of 10 percent; so that at retirement the pastor's income will be adequate for his and his family's support.

The Relief and Annuity Representative of the Tar River Association agrees with the recommendation of the convention and therefore recommends that the churches of the Tar River Association review their retirement plans and raise their pastor's retirement level to at least 10 percent of salary.





DECEMBER 16, 1985

AFTERNOON SESSION THEME: In Times Like These

1. The 156th Annual Fall Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by Rev. Gary Anderson, Moderator.

2. Mr. Sidney Driver led the group in singing "In Times Like These."

3. Rev. Roger Plemmons, pastor of Cypress Chapel Church, brought the devotion and prayer.

4. The moderator reminded the messengers that the meeting would be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order*. Rev. Frankie Tanner was appointed as parliamentarian. Mrs. Agnes Merritt moved the program in the Book of Reports be the program for the day. Motion was seconded and passed.

5. The moderator recognized new pastors since last meeting. These were introduced to the group by a member of their church. 19. Rev. Clark Rounds led the group in a memorial service.

20. Mr. Sidney Driver led the group in singing "The Old Rugged Cross."

21. Special music was presented by Rev. Richard Cato, pastor of Hickory Rock Baptist Church.

Mr. Gilford Bufkin presented the Credentials Committee Report as follows: 40 churches represented, 107 messengers, 17 alternates, 31 pastors, 10 associational officers, 30 guests, total attendance, 195. Report adopted. He recognized Mr. Ray Strickland who has served on the Credentials Committee for 21 years.

29. The Treasurer's Report was presented by Tim Lolley in the absence of Mr. Maylon Frazier. Report was adopted as printed.

30. Trustees Report was presented by the moderator as printed in the program. Report adopted.

31. Terry Alford presented the Stewardship Report and the Budget as printed in the program. Motion was made to adopt this report and budget as printed. Seconded and carried.

32. Mr. Sidney Driver led the group in singing "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross."

33. Rev. Gary Anderson presented a check to Dr. W. R. McCollum in the amount of \$12,345.00 as a expression of love appreciation from the churches in Tar River. The love offering was taken by the churches during the Week of Prayer for associational emphasis for Dr. and Mrs. McCollum. Dr. McCollum expressed thanks to the group for this love offering.

34. Special music was presented by Harris Chapel Baptist Church Choir directed by Tim Lolley.

35. The evening message taken from 2 Kings 6 was delivered by Rev. Barry Chambers, pastor of East Baptist Church, Belmont, North Carolina.

36. Closing prayer was led by Rev. David Moore, pastor of Philadelphia Baptist Church.

History of Rock Spring Baptist Church

"We, the undersigned members of Rock Spring Church, do covenant and agree that we will do the best of our ability, support and sustain this, the Baptist Church of Christ, upon the Holy Word of God."

Thus began the Rock Spring Baptist Church on April 26, 1874, under a brush arbor. Rock Spring is located in Franklin County, seven miles south of Louisburg on Highway 39. From this group of 13 charter members, the membership increased to 61 in the first year. A. J. Underhill and John Odom were the first deacons.

On January 31, 1874, Wilson T. Strickland and Wife, Mirilda, had given two and three-eighths acres of land and in 1876 a building was erected just south of the present building. Trustees were Wilson T. Strickland, Bryant Wilder, A. J. Underhill, and John H. Odom.

On April 7, 1894, Mr. M. T. Howell and Wife, Millie Ann, gave an acre of land adjoining the original plot and the auditorium of the present building was begun and was in use by 1897.

In May 1923 a building committee was appointed to formulate plans for Sunday School rooms. That committee was composed of D. V. Cheaves, John B. Wilder, W. Seba Strickland, Frank M. Baker, and Mevlin C. Wilder. In 1926, these rooms were in use.

In August 1952 Arthur T. Howell and Wife gave one-half acre of land for the purpose of building a parsonage and in June 1953 the parsonage was occupied by its first residents, Rev. and Mrs. C. L. Holland and son, Steve. This building was considerably enlarged in 1960.

In November 1961 the church began an addition at the rear of the sanctuary which included classrooms, choir loft, rest rooms, and a large basement. Work toward the completion and refinement of this project has continued at various times since.

On January 17, 1966, W. Clyde Privette and wife deeded to Rock Spring Baptist Church 0.2 acre of land, making total acreage for the church 4.3 acres.

Also, in 1974 a church sign was erected at entrance of driveway and parsonage was repainted.

In 1975 the basement was completed including a kitchen. The metal roof of the church and Sunday School rooms, which had lasted fifty years, were replaced, and also the sanctuary was painted and the ceiling was lowered.

In 1976 another year for repairs and replacements. The space heaters in the parsonage were replaced with central heat and air conditioning.

In 1977 the parsonage was painted on the inside and carpet was installed. Central heat was installed in the basement of the church.

In 1978 David Strickland gave 0.6 acre of land that joins the present cemetery.

In 1979 the parsonage was enlarged and repainted.

In 1980 the outside of the church was covered with aluminum siding.

In 1981 country road was paved through the church property.

In 1982 a large porch and steps were added to the front of the church.

In 1984 the central air and heating units were replaced and installed underneath the church. Also, (one acre) of land was acquired on the north side of present property for future building and expansion of the parking area.

The year of 1985 was one of growth, remodeling and renovation. Two ceilings were removed and the original ceiling and exposed beams were restored. New carpet was installed in the sanctuary. A gift of \$2,500.00 from the estate of Willard D. Cheaves went toward installing a baptistry and remodeling the choir loft. Eighteen new additions were also added to the membership.

Another year for improvements was 1986. Our thanks to Clyde Paniels and his in-laws and other volunteers for the use of their heavy equipment in grading the churchyard and driveway through the cemetery, plus landscaping around the church.

We make no claim to a perfect record, but reflecting on a small congregation with varying degrees of talent and commitment and working with 43 different pastors, we may well do as St. Paul did at a certain point as he traveled the Appian Way to Rome, *"thank God and take courage."* Mr. and Mrs. Francis Baker

History of Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church

RANSDELL CHAPEL CHURCH was established in the Year of our Lord and Saviour, AD 1912 under a brush arbor on a track of land donated by Mr. William Caswell "Willie" Ransdell. Mr. Ransdell said he had a vision from God to preach and build a church. Our present church is situated on that same plot which is located on the south side of County Road 1706, Harris township, eight miles south of Louisburg, North Carolina.

The Reverend Walter M. Gilmore of Louisburg was invited by Mr. Ransdell to assist him in the first service. There were about 100 people in attendance at the first meeting. A survey was made and it was apparent that most of those attending were not affiliated with any church. Therefore, Mr. Ransdell and Reverend Gilmore continued to hold services under the arbor for the rest of the summer from June until the weather was too cold for the outdoor service.

In the year 1913, under the leadership of Mr. Ransdell, a frame church was erected. Mr. Ransdell, who owned a sawmill, cut and donated timber to erect the frame church. Mr. Isaac Frazier suggested the church be named "Ransdell Chapel" in honor of Mr. Ransdell, since he was instrumental in organizing the first worship service.

Some of the earliest members of the church were: Mrs. Martha Hill Horton, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Frazier, Mrs. Mollie C. Young, Mr. W. T. Jones, and Mr. Bailey F. Pearce, Mr. J. R. Gilmore, and Mr. Preston Clifton.

Reverend Walter Gilmore preached until he resigned in 1918. He was assisted by the following pastors: Neil Rowland, Reverend Sawer, Charles F. Hudson, J. B. Davis, and C. T. Plybon. Reverend D. T. Bunn of Spring Hope, North Carolina served from 1918 until 1920.

The church was received into the Tar River Baptist Association with 17 members in 1920. During this time the first deacons were elected and ordained as follows: John R. Clifton, Preston T. Clifton, and Thomas T. Young. The first trustees were W. T. Jones, J. B. Horton, and William C. Ransdell.

From 1920 until 1938 the church was served by many different pastors.

During the 1930s Mrs. "Becky" Rebecca Jones Clifton, wife of Preston T. Clifton, loaned the church an old pedal type organ. Some of the members who played it were Mrs. Mattie S. Cliton, Miss Eleanor Ransdell, Mrs. Mable R. Medlin, and Mrs. Mattie R. Harrison.

Reverend Edward Wyche Greene of Henderson, North Carolina served from 1938-1959. The old frame building stood from 1913 to 1943 at which time it was torn down. Under the dedicated leadership of Reverend E. W. Greene, James Luther Denton, Sr., John W. Horton, Thomas T. Young, Dock Cash and Charlie Dickens, Sr., the present sanctuary and two Sunday School rooms were erected. In 1947 Mr. and Mrs. William T. Horton donated and deeded an acre of land, which included the portion already being used for a cemetery. Mr. John Bennie "Buck" Horton, William's father, had allowed use of the land as a cemetery for several years.

From the late fall of 1959-1960 Reverend Robert J. Wilkerson was pastor. Full-time worship services were implemented at this time. Following Reverend Wilkerson was Reverend John M. Wood who served from 1960 to July of 1963. The church installed hardwood floors, bought new furniture consisting of matching pews, flower stands, two chairs and a communion table. Mr. and Mrs. James S. Hunt donated the matching pulpit in memory of their daughter, Gwendolyn, who died in infancy. This pulpit replaced the handsome pulpit Reverend Ransdell had donated before his family moved to Vass, North Carolina in 1917.

Mrs. Alma L. Cates donated a carpet for the sanctuary in memory of her late husband, Franklin Thomas Cates on April 6, 1968.

Reverend George M. Rowe, Jr. was pastor from October 22, 1972, until February 17, 1974. Mr. Rowe was the first pastor to hold a baby dedication service. Reverend Rowe was ordained at Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church on June 10, 1973, by Reverend Charles Burchette, Tar River Association Missionary. Reverend Rowe baptized seven people including Stephanie, his daughter, during this period of ministry.

An addition was made to the church in 1973, this included four Sunday School rooms, two restrooms, installation of running water and two of the Sunday School rooms could be converted into a fellowship hall. Mrs. Adelle C. Cash donated the funds for the digging of the well, well pipes and the well pump in memory of her late husband, Dock Cash. Mr. and Mrs. William Thomas Horton gave the church another acre of land for the cemetery; however, the deacons decided in view of the generosity of this family in giving the previous land, the church would donate \$500.00 in appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. Horton.

Reverend George Dean Darnell served as pastor from March 10, 1974, until February 6, 1977. In 1975 the exterior of the church was bricked, the front remodeled, central heat, air conditioning, and new lights for the sanctuary were installed. Reverend Darnell was the first pastor to live in the church community since 1917. He moved on the church field on May 18, 1976. Mrs. Sandy R. Darnell was licensed to the ministry in 1976 by Ransdell Chapel. She was the first woman to be licensed by this church.

Reverend Charles E. Crawford delivered the Bicentennial Sermon on July 4, 1976. At that time, Reverend Crawford was the oldest pastor having served.

On November 23, 1976, we purchased two acres of land for the future parsonage from Mr. and Mrs. James Stone. The church now owns a total of six acres of land.

Reverend Ronnie P. Wildes became our pastor on February 27, 1977. Reverend Wildes and his Wife, Janice, resided in their mobile home on the church parsonage lot which is in sight of the church. In December 1978, under the leadership of Mrs. Janice

Wildes who was Choir Director, the Ransdell Chapel Choir began to purchase components for a sound system for the church. The system was completed in August 1979.

The church paid the debt on the previous remodeling and in December 1978 a note burning ceremony was held in the fellowship hall.

On March 18, 1979, Mrs. Etta Ransdell Ledwick, the sole surviving charter member, passed into eternity, A memorial service was held in her behalf. Because of her continuing love for the church, she left the church a substantial amount of funds, with the expression of her desire to build a pastorium. Her will was read in the church on April 8, 1979. On August 12, 1979, plans for the new pastorium were completed and the church accepted the plans.

Reverend Ronnie P. Wildes resigned on November 11, 1979, and the church called Jerry K. Sosebee on March 1, 1980. Reverend Sosebee's wife, Gail, and their two sons, Joel and Drew, also became a part of our church.

On May 13, 1980, Reverend Sosebee and his family moved into the new pastorium.

A Dedication Service was held for the pastorium on July 27, 1980. Dr. W. R. McCollum delivered the message for the ceremony. It was dedicated to the Glory of God. Members of various churches attended the ceremony.

A steeple was installed on the church on February 19, 1981.

On April 8, 1984, Reverend Sosebee tendered his resignation as pastor.

On August 5, 1984, the church called Frederick Gary Edwards as pastor. On March 10, 1985, Reverend Edwards resigned as pastor.

On June 9, 1985, the church called William "Bill" M. Salmons as their new pastor. Reverend Salmons resigned effective August 31, 1986.

Woman's Missionary Union Report

The work of Woman's Missionary Union of Tar River is conducted by approximately 1,400 members in 141 organizations of Mission Friends, Girls in Action, Acteens, Baptist Young Women, and Baptist Women.

The purpose of all the age-level organizations is to study missions, engage in missions and personal witnessing, and to support missions through prayer and giving.

Tar River WMU is governed by an Executive Committee of 11 women, each state trained to represent all age levels of WMU as well as Mission Action and Enlistment and Enlargement. These associational leaders in turn train their counterparts in the local churches. Our fall workshop was held at Cedar Rock on August 19 with approximately 150 present.

A highlight of this year was the Centennial Celebration of Woman's Missionary Union. Most of our churches participated in these events plus attending the Centennial Celebration at the Annual Meeting held in Raleigh.

Also, our Mission Action Togo project continued into this year with the following people being sent as volunteers to the work in Togo: Phillip Murray, Peggy Mooney, Charlie Smith, and Judy Hales. Tar River WMU paid all expenses for these volunteers to minister in Togo.

Tar River GA's have been active this past year also. One hundred and twelve attend a Foreign Mission Lock-in in November; 79 were present at the Mission Day Camp in May; 48 attended World Missions Week at Caswell; and 63 participated in Christmas in August. We are proud of the work of our GA's especially as they raised enough to purchase a washing machine for Missionary Scarboro and had it shipped to Belmopan, Belize.

The Mission Friends Round-up at Spring Hope was well attended by our Mission Friends organizations. -41-

Our Annual Spring Meeting was held at Union Chapel with approximately 115 in attendance. A very inspiring program was presented during the evening session by Susan Reed of the Special Ministries Department of the Baptist State Convention. This meeting is one of the highlights of the year for WMU and we are especially grateful to the churches who plan and prepare for this meeting.

Tar River WMU exists to assist the churches. Please call on your council anytime and give us the privilege of "multiplying the vision" of missions in Tar River.

Sunday School Report

In the Tar River Baptist Association, the Sunday School is responsible for reaching people for Bible study, teaching the Bible, witnessing to persons about Christ and leading them into church membership, ministering to Sunday School members and nonmembers, leading members to worship, and interpreting and undergirding the work of the church and the denomination. A strong, agressive, evangelistic Sunday School will be advancing in each of these six areas. Associational Sunday School work undergirds these six areas by enabling churches to do collectively what cannot be done separately and by helping each church to better accomplish the distinctive work God has for it to do.

Sunday School work in the Tar River Association is now in a transition stage. We are moving from the "8.5 by 85" objective to "Challenge 10/90" which calls for Southern Baptists to enroll ten million persons in Bible study by 1990. We have experienced a midyear change in leadership. Rev. Jimmy Creech has served effectively as Sunday School Director for the Tar River Association; he led us in an excellent Vacation Bible School Clinic in May. We, who have been working in the Sunday School Director. The ASSISTeam concept is currently being evaluated for its effectiveness and need in our association. We regret to admit that we have few requests for ASSISTeam involvement with individual churches. We will be continuing with the annual Sunday School Leadership Clinic in the fall.

A new concept in Sunday School work which has exciting potential in our area is Outreach Bible Study. Outreach Bible Study is evangelistic, direct, small-group, shortterm Bible study for the lost and unchurched on neutral ground and sponsored by the Sunday School. The objective is two-fold. First, it is a way of clearly communicating to people what they must do to become a Christian. Second, it is a feeder to involvement in the Sunday School for those who are not yet ready to formally become a part of the church. The materials are self-contained, inexpensive, and easy to use. Director of Missions Report

Our final report consists of a dozen of the dozens of things that we have had the joy of accomplishing together since 1978. Without God's help, your help, and Martha's help, these good things would not have happened.

1. Tar River Baptist Association had the services of its first full-time secretary. Martha began in 1978 at a salary of \$200.00 per year and was here full-time. Martha has printed over 100,000 pieces of material for Tar River every year since 1978, in addition to keeping records, filing, telephone and regular office duties. She has loved serving refreshments and meals to hundred of committees that met in our office.

2. Your Association has received one hundred percent (100%) financial support from all 43 churches for the past seven years.

3. We had three Associational meetings with record-breaking attendance. There were two Pastor/Deacons Banquets and one Sunday School Banquet, each with almost 600 happy Christians present and praising the Lord.

4. Tar River Baptist Association has become independent of financial aid from the Baptist State Convention for the first time in many years. Our Associational Budget has grown from \$21,460.00 in 1978 to \$52,211.00 in 1986.

5. You doubled the size of your Associational office at the small cost of only \$3,000.00 by furnishing volunteer labor.

6. The Bailey Baptist Church started the first new mission in Tar River in over 50 years.

7. Your Director of Missions conducted successful pioneer mission revivals in various places in our nation since 1978. Some of them were: Utah, Florida, Maryland, Virginia, and North Carolina.

8. You have replaced worn-out office equipment with new and modern equipment; such as, an IBM typewriter, a new stencil burner, an addressing machine, a copying machine, a new projector screen, a new 16 mm projector, a new slide projector, and an adding machine.

9. You have enjoyed a great increase of churches with full-time pastors. In 1978, 76 percent of our churches were using part-time student pastors. Today, only 21 percent of our churches are using part-time student pastors.

10. Our Ministers' Conference attendance has more than doubled since 1978.

11. We had one semiannual meeting with all 43 churches represented. Representation has been excellent at all of our semiannual meetings.

12. Since 1978 the total mission giving of the Tar River Baptist Association has been \$1,683.00. This does not include our gifts in 1986 which have been generous. Since 1978 the Tar River Baptist Association has baptized 1,392 people into the churches. This does not include those won in 1986 during and after our Good News America, God Loves You Revivals, which will be considerable.

As Martha and I see our ministry in Tar River coming to a close, these are just one dozen of the dozens of things we have been privileged to share with you. We have been truly blessed by the opportunity to work with the finest people in the world here in Tar River. Truly for us, God did save the best until last. We shall always love you all.





Constitution

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II — PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

ARTICLE III — MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet biannually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring season

ARTICLE IV — RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V — DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; messengers; give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter, these to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches, and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII — OFFICERS

The officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer (with the privilege of combining the office of Clerk and Treasurer), Auditor, Historian, Trustees, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Stewardship Chairman, Chairman of the Social Services Committee, and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee. The Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Clerk, the Historian, the Trustees, the Chairman of the Social Services Committee and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence at the conclusion of the session. The Treasurer and the Auditor shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence on January 1. The Sunday School Director, the Church Training Director, the Music Director, the Chairman of Evangelism and the Stewardship Chairman are to be elected in the spring meeting of the association and their terms of office shall commence upon election. The above officers shall be elected annually. At such times as the Association shall elect a Director of Missions, he becomes an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, to enforce the rules, to preserve order, and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also serve as ex officio chairman of the Executive Committee of the Association. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, to serve as Vice Chairman of the Executive Committee and to serve as Chairman of the Missions Committee.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the body, and use all diligence in having same printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible, to mail the church clerks reminders by church letters forthcoming and to keep on hand the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body. He shall also serve as ex officio secretary of the Executive Committee.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse the monies contributed for the expenses of the body as authorized by the Executive Body.

E. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and report to the Association annually.

F. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and to report at the annual session of the Association.

G. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to respond, within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Association.

H. It shall be the duty of the Associational Church Training Director to promote the interests of Church Training within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

I. It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Director to promote the interests of the Sunday Schools within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

J. It shall be the duty of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director to promote the interests of the Woman's Missionary Union within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished. This officer's election may be a confirmation of election by the Associational Woman's Missionary Union.

K. It shall be the duty of the Associational Brotherhood Director to promote interests of the Brotherhood within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

L. The Associational Music Director shall plan and direct the music for all meetings of the Association and its Executive Committee and shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music in the churches of the Association.

M. Three (3) Trustees shall be elected from the membership of the Association to hold title of all property of the Association, to act under the direction of the Association through its Executive Committee to execute necessary legal documents, and to supervise the maintenance of all property belonging to the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive by purchase, gift or otherwise title to real and personal property and to see, convey or mortgage same for the use and benefit of said Association and its officers and agents upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of said Tar River Association.

The Trustees shall also be responsible for and keep an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association. An additional copy of this inventory shall be filed with the Treasurer and at the Associational office.

Trustees are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

N. It shall be the duty of the Associational Stewardship Chairman to both encourage and keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the stewardship of the total Christian life and witness. He shall make an annual progress report to the Association.

O. The Moderator shall appoint the Parliamentarian at each session of the Association and/or Executive Committee meeting.

ARTICLE IX — EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Associational officers as set forth in Article VII, Director of Missions, Moderator for the past year, along with key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Committee members shall be members of the church they represent. If your church does not have all these leaders, you may appoint a representative for a committee prior to the regular Fall Annual Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Directors of Missions is an ex officio member of the Executive Committee and does not have the power to vote.

C. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

- 1. The Executive Committee of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary and to define his duties.
- 2. To act for the Association between regular sessions of the body.
- 3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.
- 4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
- 5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the annual budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.
- 6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Committee in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

ARTICLE X — OTHER COMMITTEES

The following committees whose duties are prescribed below shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new committee will take office.

A. NOMINATING COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to nominate the members of the various committees and chairmen and Associational officers deemed necessary to facilitate the work of the Association. The Nominating Committee will be appointed hereafter by the Moderator of the Association. This committee shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to provide the Association with authority for operation to determine the extent of the powers of the Association and to examine Articles of Faith and recommend the admission of new churches to the Association. It is the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association by badges as voting members of the Association.

C. FINANCE COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to propose a budget to the Executive Committee and to suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. The committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. This committee shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as ex officio member of this committee.

D. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to receive all resolutions presented to the Association.

This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting, officers of the Association, etc.

E. TIME, PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational meeting.

F. MISSIONS COMMITTEE composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Chairman, Stewardship Chairman, and three (3) members at large, whose duty will be to assist the Director of Missions in the planning, promoting, and execution of Associational programs, making recommendations to the Executive Committee. G. PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association whose duty shall be to receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Missions Committee Chairman, Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form, for the sessions of the Association, which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business. The host pastors shall be included in this committee.

H. CONSTITUTIONAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes.

I. SOCIAL SERVICES COMMITTEE shall be composed of one representative each of the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Homes for Aging and Baptist Hospital whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of these institutions.

J. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of a Christian Literature representative, a Christian Education representative, and one member at large whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

ARTICLE XI - ORDAINING COUNCIL

In order to preserve the Baptist position with reference to the divine call to the ministry, and to recognize the responsibility of a local church to the entire Baptist denomination, the Association shall elect annually an ordaining council that may act in an advisory capacity for churches seeking its assistance. In setting up this council and in its work, the following things are to be noted:

A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership, and that the request from the church come to the Association through the Chairman of the Ordaining Council or the Associational Office.

B. That the church in which the candidate holds membership elect to the council three members, one of them the pastor, provided he is not the candidate for ordination.

C. That the Tar River Association elect six members to constitute a standing ordaining council, to serve with the three members appointed by the local church, one of which shall be designated chairman by the Moderator. These shall serve terms of three years, and shall be ineligible to succeed themselves.

D. That the Council then proceed according to the approved guidelines for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

E. That we encourage insofar as it is practical public ordination services.

F. That the Tar River Association furnish the minister thus set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry by this council with credentials signed by the Moderator and Clerk of the Association and by each member of the Council.

ARTICLE XII - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XIII - AMENDMENTS

This Constitution of the Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment(s) will be presented to afternoon session and voted on no earlier than evening session.

ARTICLE XIV – PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

Bylaws

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. Any resolution to be presented to the Executive Committee and/or semiannual Associational Meetings, must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Association and published in the Associational newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.

10. Reports of committees on Convention objects must be brief - that on missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to:

Librarian of Wake Forest College, Winston-Salem, North Carolina Biblical Recorder, Raleigh, North Carolina Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee State Baptist Convention

13. The Clerk and Treasurer shall receive honorariums to be determined by the Executive Committee for their services as an expression of appreciation.

14. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

Held at RED BUD BAPTIST CHURCH Wood Baptist Church, Assisting April 21, 1987

AFTERNOON SESSION Theme: "Steadfast Faith In A New Day"

(Note from Clerk: Reports are not printed in the Proceedings. The reports are placed in this annual following the Proceedings.)

1. The 157th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by Rev. Gary Anderson, Moderator.

2. Mrs. Sandra Wood led the opening hymn, "The Solid Rock."

3. Rev. Russell Potter, pastor of Harris Chapel Baptist Church, read from I Peter 5:6 and led the group in prayer.

4. The moderator reminded the messengers that the meeting would be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order* and that only duly elected messengers or alternates would be eligible to vote. Mr. Epp Cattlet was appointed to serve as parliamentarian.

5. Mrs. Agnes Merritt presented the report from the Program Committee with two minor changes in the program: 1. the deletion of the Auditor's Report which is not due at the spring meeting; and 2. the exchange of the message at 4:30 with the Director of Missions report.

6. Our new Director of Missions, Rev. Bill Wallace was presented to the group followed by one new pastor since the last meeting, Rev. Earl Pennell, Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church.

7. The histories of the host churches were read by Herbert Smith, Red Bud Baptist Church and Rev. James Jarrell, Wood Baptist Church.

8. Mrs. Sandra Wood led the group in singing "Faith Of Our Fathers."

9. The Retirement Homes Report was presented as printed. Mrs. Peggy Furlow represented the Retirement Homes and spoke to the group. One of the two residents attending with her read some of her poems to the group. These were enjoyed by all.

10. The Baptist Hospital Report was presented by Rev. Jimmy Creech as printed. Mr. Calvin Knight from the Baptist Hospital was introduced and spoke to the group.

11. The Children's Homes Report was presented as printed and Mr. Charles Tanner from the Children's Homes was introduced to speak to the group.

12. The Annuity Board Report was presented by Rev. Danny Benfield as printed.

13. Rev. Bill Wallace presented his report to the group. Following the report, Mr. Wallace introduced his daughter, Marilyn Holland, who delivered special music before his message, "Bonds of Unity", I Corinthians 12.

14. Mrs. Sandra Wood led the group in singing "Faith Is The Victory."

15. Old Business: Rev. Gary Anderson called attention to a copy of the letter on page 16 of the program concerning the law suit pending against Tar River. Also, he reported on the article in *The Franklin Times* about zoning of the property in Louisburg in order that we can build a new office building. He encouraged good attendance at the next town meeting from members of the association.

16. New Business: Mrs. Agnes Merritt was recognized to make the following motion: That a certificate of appreciation be presented to Gary Anderson who has served us so faithful as our moderator for the past two years. Gary expressed his appreciation to the association for their support.

17. Mr. Bobby Strickland presented the Nominating Committee report as printed. A motion was made and seconded that we accept the report. Motion carried.

18. Mr. Maylon Frazier presented the Treasurer's Report as printed.

19. Mrs. Nan Jones presented the Executive Committee report as printed.

20. Mrs. Agnes Merritt presented the report from the Missions Committee as in the program. Mrs. Merritt made the motion that we accept Recommendation I as printed. Motion seconded and carried. She presented Recommendation II to the group. This recommendation was opened for discussion and will be voted on at the fall meeting in October. It was noted that Recommendation II should read "beginning in the fall of 1988" - not 1987 as printed.

21. Mrs. Sandra Wood led the group in singing "Leaning on The Everlasting Arms".

22. Special music was presented by Rev. Steve Kegley, Franklinton Baptist Church.

23. The annual sermon, "The Challenge of Faith for a New Day" was delivered by Rev. Jim Hales, Bailey Baptist Church.

24. Following a prayer of thanksgiving, the session adjourned for the evening meal.

25. The evening session began at 7:30 p.m. with Rev. Gary Anderson presiding. The group sang "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

26. Rev. David Story, Peachtree Baptist Church, read scripture and led the opening prayer.

27. Mrs. Myrtle Parrish presented the Resolution Committee report as printed.

28. Mr. Gilford Bufkin presented the following report from the Credentials Committee: 34 churches represented; 103 messengers, 12 alternates, 25 pastors, 9 associational officers, and 41 guests, totaling 192 in attendance.

29. Special music was presented by the Spring Hope First Baptist Church choir.

30. The evening message was brought by Rev. Talmadge Wilcox, pastor of Providence Baptist Church, Providence, North Carolina. The scripture came from II Timothy 2:11-26, "A Charge and Challenge to the Church."

31. Following the message, the benediction was given by Rev. James A. Jarrell. The session was adjourned.

History of Red Bud Baptist Church

Red Bud Baptist Church was organized at Lawrence's meeting house the Saturday before the first Sunday in October 1823. In its early history, Red Bud was a member of the Kehukee Association of Halifax County. Through disagreements concerning missions, the church was one of eight who left this association to join four churches of the Raleigh Association to form the Tar River Association in 1830.

The land (approximately 4 acres) was given to the church by the Jim Nick Sills' family of Nash County. The church building of wood structure is located ¹/₂ mile north of the creek from which it got its name. The 1921 edition of *The History of the Tar River Association* mentions that Red Bud was probably constituted by members of Sandy Creek. Many of our earlier records were lost in a fire at Wake Forest Seminary in the early 1900's.

In 1855, a Sunday School was organized with 8 officers and 35 pupils. The same year the membership was 106. By 1867, that number had grown to 203. The church began to help support State and Foreign Missions in 1878. P.H. Pernell served as pastor through 1883.

J.A. Pitchford served as pastor from 1884 until 1889. In 1884, the Sunday School had 74 pupils with 50 average attendance. Mission gifts were still strong for education and orphanages. The pastors salary was \$125.00 a year.

J.A. Bridges was pastor from 1890 until 1891. The membership was 204. In 1892, A.A. Pippins came as pastor and Red Bud had 31 baptisms, the largest in its history. T.S. Collie, who resided in the Cedar Rock community, walked to Red Bud and served as superintendent for many years. A.A. Pippins pastored through 1897. The church maintained 223 members during this time.

In 1898, C.C. Williams came as pastor and served until 1900 or 1901. Preaching was held the second Sunday. J.E. Hoeutt came in 1902 as pastor. The Sunday School had 115 enrolled.

The basic structure of the present wood building was completed in 1906. At this time, a new pulpit was added and the first organ was purchased. A.G. Wilcox was pastor.

G.M. Duke came to Red Bud as pastor in 1909 and served through 1914. In 1914, there were 233 members with 89 enrolled in Sunday School. A.G. Wilcox again served as pastor from 1916 through 1920.

In 1921, A.N. Corpening came and served two years as pastor. A BYPU was organized with 21 enrolled. The Lord's Supper was held quarterly. A 12 month Sunday School was begun.

In 1925, C.L. Gillispie came and served as pastor through 1927. During his pastorate, a building committee was named and progress was made toward remodeling the building.

Charles Howard came as pastor in 1928 and served two years. During his stay, the building program mentioned earlier was completed. The church now had 6 Sunday School rooms and faced Highway 58. In 1929, we had 182 members with an average attendance of 75.

Julius Hopkins, John Walton and Charles Gillispie filled the pulpit from 1930 until 1932. E.G. Walker accepted the church in September, 1932 and served until 1934. The total budget for this year was \$300.00.

John Edwards was pastor in 1935. During his pastorate, the Unified Budget Plan was approved. He served a field of five churches - Centerville, Red Bud, Hickory Rock, Sandy Creek, and Mount Zion.

Paul Childers became pastor of Red Bud in 1944. Our first central heating system was installed and three new Sunday School rooms were added during his pastorate.

R. Eugene Ownes accepted the pastorate here in November, 1951. He served until 1956. During this period, we purchased two acres of land from W.J. Lancaster of Castalia for the purpose of changing our driveway and for our cemetery.

Gattis Perry accepted the pastorate in October, 1956, and served until February, 1960. During his stay, we remodeled our pulpit and added hardwood floors in the auditorium. The building was covered again.

James Howard Pernell came to serve as pastor in June 1960. In March, 1961, Robert R. Boone accepted the church. During his ministry many improvements were made. Two new bathrooms were installed and we bought a new organ and piano. A porch was added to the building and new carpet. We also bought a tractor and mower.

Everette Parson came to Red Bud in May, 1964. He served as pastor until October, 1965. Mr. Parson was waiting to be called by the Foreign Mission Board. He left for Equador shortly after. We remember him for his sincerity and devotion to mission work.

James Estep was elected and accepted to serve as pastor in April, 1966. He served three years. The Estep family was the first to occupy our new parsonage.

R.E. Hatcher came to Red Bud in July, 1969, and served as pastor until June, 1971. The church membership in 1970 was 205. We gave \$1,027.00 to missions in 1970.

Glenn Fassanella came to Red Bud on August 7, 1971. During his pastorate, we remodeled the inside of our sanctuary. Our 150th anniversary was observed.

Harold Beam accepted the church as pastor in June, 1974. This year our educational building was completed. The Tar River Association met at Red Bud this year.

Ralph Hooker accepted the church as pastor May 5, 1976. While Mr. Hooker was here, we adopted the Family Ministry Plan.

Burke Holland came to supply for us from June 1980 until December 1980. Sunday, January 4, 1981, Norman Philbeck was ordained pastor of Red Bud Church. This ordination was conducted by Burke Holland and Red Bud Church. Soon after the Philbecks came, we purchased a van. Our baptistry was installed during this period.

Allen Leo Lowery preached his first sermon as pastor June 2, 1985. Sunday morning, August 25, 1985, we held our first Baptismal Service in our new baptistry. Travis Wood and Alton Murphy were baptized. The Lowery's are still with us.

We cannot close this history without paying tribute to our Lord and those soldiers of the cross who in leaner years paved the way for us to have a sanctuary in which to worship.

The saints and sinners of Red Bud Baptist Church have known joy and sadness during the last 164 years. The future is full of challenges and barriers, but we believe that the grace and wisdom of the Lord will prevail in our search for a closer walk and deeper realization of God.

In 1914, a group of Southern Baptists in Wood, North Carolina, gathered together and decided to organize a much-needed place of worship. On October 3, 1915, Bethany Baptist Church was received into the Tar River Association. At that time, the church had 37 members. The Rev. J.J. Marshall, a blind Associational Missionary, began preaching for the congregation in 1914, using a Braille Bible.

In 1917, the name of the church was changed from Bethany to Wood Baptist Church. In 1921, the membership had reached 45. Another Baptist church in the Wood community, Mount Hebron, was torn down and many of these people moved their membership to Wood.

The church was located on Johnson Street, constructed of lumber and painted white. Sunday School classes were created by using curtains to make partitions in the building.

The membership reached 225 by 1944 and these people decided that a new building was greatly needed. When the opportunity arose to purchase the Wood Elementary School at auction in 1948, the church bought the building. Harvest sales and suppers sponsored by the church raised the funds to pay for the building and land.

The old school building was converted to the Wood Baptist Church in 1949 with extensive remodeling costing the church \$11,272.09. Beautiful stained glass windows have also been added to the sanctuary by members of the congregation in memory of various loved ones. The new church was dedicated on July 26, 1951.

Sometime around the year 1961 or 1962, the church undertook the project of building a parsonage for their pastors. Again, the spirit of Christian cooperation, love and concern, let the people work together in many ways until this lovely five-room home was constructed.

The following men of God have led the people at Wood in many undertakings in furthering not only the physical structures, but also the spiritual kingdom of God, from 1914 to the present: J.J. Marshall, J.U. Teague, L.W. Teague, S.S. McGregor, A.N. Corpening, H.F. Wright, E.J. Caldwell, J.C. Yates, G.B. Love, D.J. Owens, John Edwards, W.N. Brookshire, R.O. Bennett, Jr., W.W. Turner, Horace Thompson, B.W. Gordon, John Carter, Aaron Conn, Dwight Cumbee, Morris Briggs, R.R. Boone, Everett Parsons, David Dickerson, Albert Sherbert, Max Godwin, Larry Thompson, Sherrill Lane, David Trimbur, Robert Young, and Jimmy Jarrell.

Many people have served the church diligently through the years. There have been too many to mention them all, but to name a few: Mrs. W.D. Fuller, who served for 48 years as choir director and organist; Mrs. Louise Gupton, who has served as Sunday School teacher for 35 years and Mr. Linwood H. Gupton, who retired from the Deacon board this year after having served for 41 years.

- Carolyn Bunting was appointed Assistant to the President for Admissions.
- Jim Saul was appointed Assistant to the President for Personnel.
- Don Peiffer was appointed Assistant to the President for Business Affairs.
- A video tape, "Not An Ordinary Person," produced by the Homes in 1985, won the M.E. Dodd Award for Video and Film Productions.
- Residential and apartment living remain available. Requests should be made through the Assistant to the President for Admissions.

Under the focused and energetic leadership of Bill Stillerman, President of the Homes since November, 1985, the fine tradition initiated by past Presidents will continue. By remaining sensitive to retirement care issues and by staying informed and supportive of services offered by the Retirement Homes, North Carolina Baptists can help assure a system of services adequate to the growing demand.

Annuity Board Report

Everyone needs good retirement planning. The foundation for that planning is building financial resources for the future. With financial security you can feel free to do things you enjoy doing. The retirement years can truly become the "Elective Years." A good financial plan is administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention known as the Church Annuity Plan. This plan provides retirement benefits for ministers and church employees.

Southern Baptist churches, their ministers and employees contribute to the Church Annuity Plan. A minimum monthly contribution equal to 10 percent of compensation is recommended. These contributions build a monetary value to provide retirement or survivor benefits.

A new expansion of the Church Annuity Plan goes into effect January 1, 1988, for those participants and churches that agree to do so. This expanded plan offers a new matching feature. The minister or employee contributes and the church matches those contributions with two dollars for every one the employee contributes to a maximum of 10 percent of annual salary. The church can also make the minister's contribution. Then the Baptist State Convention matches $\frac{1}{3}$ the total amount contributed - up to \$35 per month or \$450 per vear for each eligible participant.

The expanded Church Annuity Plan is a major step toward making the minister's or church employee's retirement dreams come true in the face of inflation and increasing financial demands.

I urge each church in Tar River to act as responsible employers by providing your share of contributions toward retirement for the years of service to your church. Do not allow a former minister or employee end up destitute in retirement. Adopt the expanded Church Annuity Plan as soon as possible.

North Carolina Baptist Hospital

From the modest beginnings in 1923, North Carolina Baptist Hospital has grown from an eighty-bed community hospital to a 701-bed facility serving the region and nation. Today, the hospital and The Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest University form one of the nation's 127 academic medical centers.

The combined talents of more than 3,600 employees provide outstanding health care in settings as diverse as the outpatient clinics, the burn unit, and the intensive care nursery. There talents are backed by the most modern facilities and equipment. A concern for the patient's spiritual and psychological welfare is evidenced by the hospital's large and active Department of Pastoral Care and its extensive counseling program.

One of the exciting developments at the hospital is a new procedure called lithotripsy which has made surgery unnecessary for most people who have large kidney stones. Lithotripsy requires no incision but uses high energy shock waves to pulverize the stone so that the fine particles can then pass naturally. Rather than surgery, 8-10 days in the hospital, and additional weeks of recovery at home, most typical patients are treated and discharged the same day or the day after. Fifteen hundred such patients were treated in 1986-87.

Another exciting development is the hospital's AirCare Helicopter Service which transported 423 patients in 1986-87. "We anticipate this service will mean a difference between life and death for many persons as well as quicker and more complete recovery for them."

In July 1986, Baptist Hospital performed its first heart transplant. Many other medical procedures attract less attention and publicity but are no less important. For example in 1986-87, over 1,100 open-heart procedures, 26 kidney transplants, over 2,700 cardiac catherterizations and nearly 15,000 chemotherpy treatments were performed.

These are exciting times in Baptist Hospital. A children's hospital within Baptist Hospital will be opened in 1988. A new patient tower will increase bed capacity to more than 800 by 1988. Baptist Hospital gives special thanks to all of you who support and participate in the Homes and Hospital Offering in May or whenever your church receives this offering. The hospital continues to admit patients who have no other means of paying. Your offerings help to pay these hospital bills as well as support all the other important phases of Baptist Hospital.

Baptist Children's Homes Report - 1986

The centennial year for the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina was concluded with an exciting, informative and inspiring day on November 11, 1985. The exciting words of Dr. Blackwell, in behalf of our staff, children and trustees, renewed the commitment to continue fulfilling the mission and broad purpose of this child care ministry. Those words still ring in the ears of those present for this occasion.

The mission is to care for dependent, neglected, homeless and troubled children; unwed mothers and their children; and the rendering of related services to the relatives. Services are directed toward the preservation, conservation and rehabilitation of families to avoid, wherever possible, the placement of the child away from home.

In our one hundred and first year of child care, more than 1,500 children were served. From this group of children/youth, many had no religious affiliation when admitted to our care. Our pastors baptized more than 25 youths into the fellowship of the local church.

The new Homes and Hospital Offering, approved by the convention last November, claimed the attention of our staff during the first five months of 1986. The offering was received in May with 50 percent of that which was received going to the Children's Homes, 25 percent to the hospital and 25 percent to the retirement homes. The goal was \$1.6 million. We encourage you to help promote the new offering in your church during May 1987.

UPDATE/RALEIGH AREA:

The Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina work with families who are hurting due to problems within the family. We seek to help the family identify the problems and then help the family find some way to work through the situation. Major emphasis is placed on getting family members to talk with us and then to talk with each other.

Sometimes living apart may be necessary. This need may be met through emergency care, foster care, group care, therapeutic camping or maternity care. Through the services of Baptist Chilldren's Homes, counseling sessions are available for those who remain in the home but who may need help in identifying feelings and learning to talk about those feelings. The Kate Parham Watkins Emergency Care Home in Henderson cared for 33 children/youth this past year. Mr. and Mrs. Rodney G. Campbell continue to serve effectively as child care workers. The Campbells would be delighted for you or your group to visit the home soon. Call them at (919) 438-3133.

Executive Committee Report

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the last semi-annual meeting.

DECEMBER 15, 1986



AFTERNOON SESSION THEME: Lay Involvement Now

1. The 157th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by Rev. Gary Anderson, Moderator.

2. Mrs. Sandra Wood led the opening hymn, "Blessed Assurance."

3. Rev. Ed Revelle, pastor of Union View Baptist Church, read scripture from Genesis 12:1-4 and led the group in prayer.

(1) The Associational Council moves that the motion presently on the floor calling for one annual meeting consisting of two consecutive sessions on Monday and Tuesday nights be amended by having one annual meeting in the fall consisting of three sessions: an afternoon session on Monday followed by a meal, an evening session on Monday night, and an evening session on Tuesday night. Motion was seconded and carried.

(2) The Associational Council recommends that we adopt the San Remon Indian Village Church in Belize, Central America as a Tar River Associational project. Motion was seconded. Rev. Anderson and Rev. Wallace both spoke to the motion in way of explanation as to how Tar River would be involved in this project. After several questions and discussion, the vote was taken with 47 for an 50 against adoption of this project. Motion was defeated.

(3) Dr. Harry Kahn was recognized with proposed constitution change that was pending until this meeting. Constitution Committee report is printed in program. Dr. Ray Pruett made motion that we make this change. Motion seconded and carried.

16. The Evangelism Report was accepted as printed in the program.

17. The Executive Committee report was accepted as printed. Twenty-one church clerks were recognized for sending in their 1987 church letters on time. Special appreciation was expressed to the Tar River clerks.

18. The Director of Missions Report was presented as printed.

19. The Nominating Committee report was presented by the Moderator. A motion was made to adopt the report as printed. Motion seconded and carried. The Installation of Officers was given by Rev. Jimmy Creech, pastor of First Baptist Church, Spring Hope.

20. A very meaningful Memorial Service was presented by Rev. Aubrey Tomlinson.

21. The moderator announced that \$1,488.10 was received through the love offering taken earlier in the afternoon.

22. The moderator offered the prayer for the evening meal.

EVENING SESSION

23. The evening session was opened with the hymn, "To God Be The Glory" led by Mrs. Sandra Wood.

24. Rev. James Horton led the group in scripture and prayer from Phillipians 3:8-16.

25. The Resolutions Committee report was given by our moderator as follows: A special word of appreciation is extended to the Perry's Chapel Baptist Church and the Union View Baptist Church for hosting our meeting today. Special thanks are given for the delicious meal. A special work of thanks is extended to Nanette Warren and all the members of the choir for the beautiful music presented. We express our appreciation to our speakers for the meeting today and to all who had a part in any way."

26. Mr. Gilford Bufkin presented the following report from the Credentials Committee: 39 churches and mission represented, 115 messengers, 26 guests, 11 alternates, 31 pastors, 15 associational officers for a total of 198 in attendance.

27. Mr. Bufkin also presented the Credentials Committee report as printed in the program regarding the acceptance of Oak Grove Baptist Church into Tar River Association. A motion was made to accept, seconded and passed. The pastor and chairman of deacons were asked to come down to receive the right hand of fellowship.

28. The treasurer's report was presented as printed.

29. The trustees' report was presented as printed.

30. Dr. Mike Thompson presented the Christian Education report and recognized Ms. Marge Shelton from Meredith College to speak to the group.

31. Mr. Terry Alford was recognized for the Finance Committee report and Adoption of Budget for 1988. A motion was made that we accept the budget as printed. Motion seconded and carried. A motion was made from the committee that \$5,000 be transferred and set up as the Tar River Association Building Fund. Motion seconded and carried.

32. Following another hymn and special music by the choir, the Doctrinal Sermon "Who's In Charge Here?" was given by Rev. Clark Rounds, pastor of Ephesus Baptist Church.

33. Following the message, Rev. Gary Anderson, our Moderator for the past two years turned the gavel over to Mr. Terry Alford. Mr. Alford expressed appreciation to Rev. Anderson for his faithfulness and dedication to our Association.

34. The pastor and members of the Oak Grove Baptist Church were asked to come down to the front along with Rev. and Mrs. Wallace and everyone was asked to come by to welcome them to our Association.

35. The adjournment and benediction was led by Mr. Terry Alford.



History of Perry's Chapel Baptist Church

In 1822, near Cap Rock, about one mile north of Needmoor, there was organized an inter-denominational church called Shiloh, whose membership was composed of Baptist and others of different faiths. In 1844, due largely to the opposition of a segment of the membership to efforts being made to incorporate the church into the Methodist Conference, the church disbanded. This decision was influenced by a grant made by Jeremiah Perry, whereby he sold for one dollar the present site of Perry's Chapel, to a group that would soon make up the church. The grant was made to Rev. Josiah Crudup, Allen C. Perry, Levin Perry, Jordan R. Sherrod and Joshua Perry as trustees and managers and their successors forever to build thereon a meeting house for the Baptist denomination of Christians in that section to have a church and worship Almighty God agreeably to the dictates of their own conscience. This grant made the 7th day of September, 1844.

In 1844, when the church was organized, the membership was composed of thirtyfour whites and ninety-seven blacks, however, by 1848 the number had changed to nineteen whites and 107 blacks; the inference is that slaves of each household were required to attend church. In view of the fact that a state law at that time prohibited the education of slaves in North Carolina, it bespeaks a good word for the pioneers of Perry's Chapel that they had the wisdom to care for the spiritual life of their vassals.

Perry's Chapel had belonged to the Tar River Association from its beginning, and in 1855, the church was host to the annual association meeting. But five months after the War Between the States, on September 29, 1865, a letter was granted to the church to affiliate with any other association of like faith and order. A week later the church was received into the Central Association. The membership of the church consisted of 43 whites and 76 blacks at this date.

In 1868, the Rev. W.A. Barrett was called for a yearly salary of \$100.00. The church minutes record a resolution the black members coming into the membership would not be allowed to vote, but otherwise would have the same priviledges they had before the war. In 1874, the blacks were granted permission to hold their own services in the church once each month. The blacks numbered 29 and whites had increased to 94.

The first record of any Sunday School at Perry's was in 1871, with Mr. Robert F. Andrews as superintendent. And it was during the period 1883-1885 that the first Woman's Missionary Society was organized by Miss Lucy Freeman of Rolesville. It was also during these years that the first musical instrument, an organ, was purchased. About 1886, the present building was erected. While Rev. Tom B. Justice served the church from 1903-1908, the church was enlarged, painted and renovated. Also under Rev. Justice's leadership, the church printed its Articles of Faith and Church Covenant,


distributing them to the members.


In 1918, the Central Association met with the church for a second time and that year the church went to half-time services, meeting only two Sundays each month.

In October 1922, a Wake Forest student, Sankey L. Blanton was called as pastor for a yearly salary of \$360.00.

The Central Association met twice at Perry's Chapel during the 1930's. More than 200 were present at the 1931 meeting and the crowd was so large in 1939 the building could not accommodate everyone.

Two years prior to 1939, a rotating system for the Board of Deacons was adopted with two deacons retiring every four years according to service.





June 4, 1944 marked the Centennial Celebration and Homecoming. There was dinner on the grounds, and a roll call of membership. Recognition was given to 22 men who were serving in the Armed Forces at that time, three of whom were killed in action.

During the pastorate of Rev. L.H. Knott, Perry's was led to build additional Sunday School space, and 6 new classrooms were completed in 1951. A new gas heating system was installed and a church budget was adopted for the first time under the guidance of Rev. R.J. Hogan, who served as pastor from 1951-1955.

In 1956, the Rev. Hayne Rivers was called as the first full-time pastor. The church went on a full-time program, voting to pay the pastor \$3,000 per year and to provide a pastorium. By 1957 the church had grown to a membership of 236 and church history had been completed by Thomas M. Elmore. Additional Sunday School rooms were provided, a walkway was laid and the budget grew from \$2,600 to \$9,500 in two years.

Full-time pastors since then have included the following: Billy T. Mobley (1958-1959), Meredith H. Henderson (1959-1961), Don P. Stroud (1961-1964), Thomas A. Clarke (1965-1967), Cletus J. Gilbert (1968-1969), James R. Luck (1969-1972), J. Steven Bolton (1972-1977), Ralph M. Warren (1977-1980), William P. Connell, Jr. (1980-1982), Michael E. Hampton (1983-1987).

In 1962 the church purchased a Hammond Organ, the third organ in the history of the church. The church sanctuary was remodeled in the fall of 1967 with the addition of new pews, pulpit furniture, communion table and carpet. Ten memorial windows were installed beginning in 1968. In 1971, the church was painted, walkways poured, a new piano was given in memoriam, an outside bullentin board was erected and the parsonage was repaired and painted.

On June 26, 1977, a ground-breaking ceremony was held after worship service for a 3200 square foot Educational Building. On May 18, 1980, the Educational Building was dedicated with no indebtness.

The first church directory was delivered to the church on April 8, 1982. In 1983, the Tar River Association W.M.U. spring meeting was co-hosted by Perry's Chapel, Franklinton, Union View and Louisburg churches.

On January 8, 1978, Ralph M. Warren and on May 8, 1983, Michael E. Hampton were ordained as ministers of the Gospel at Perry's Chapel. On September 19, 1983, the church was host to the Tar River Sunday School Teachers Clinic.

For many years the church has celebrated the 4th of July with a "Pig-Pickin." In October the children of "all ages" go on a hay ride and later enjoy a cook-out. In November our church joins our neighbor church for a joint Thanksgiving service. The first of December each year the Adult I and II classes honor the Seniors of the church and community with a Christmas dinner. The Adult and Children Choirs present a cantata and pageant for the congregation.

In January 1986, the WMU of Perry's Chapel had a Centennial celebration honoring the 100 years of progress the organization had made. On June 29, 1986, a dedication service was held for the new Baptistry and five people were baptised at the service. On August 3, 1986, the WMU hosted the "Christmas in August" for the Tar River Association. Also, in August, the GA's attended "World Missions Week" at Camp Caswell.

In the spring of 1987 the sanctuary and Education Building were covered with vinyl siding. In May 1987, the pastor, Michael E. Hampton, read his resignation to go as a missionary to Indonesia effective July 1, 1987. On June 7, 1987, a pastor appreciation reception was held at the church for the pastor and his family.

Perry's Chapel has been blessed in many ways during its long history. May we continue to seek the power of the Holy Spirit to lead us in the years to come.

History of Union View Baptist Church

On July 3, 1944, the Union View Baptist Church was organized with Red Garner from the First Baptist Church in Henderson bringing the message and the Rev. A.W. Icard, who came to Franklinton in April, 1944 and preached a revival, then later started preaching twice a month, was called as pastor and served the church until March, 1955.

The church was organized in a one-room building that was located on the adjoining lot to the present church building where the parsonage was before moving it to Franklin Street. The one-room building and lot was later purchased from Mr. J.P. Jenkins. It was in this one-room building that the church was organized into a Missionary Baptist Church.

The church was organized with the following charter members of which the following are dead: Mr. and Mrs. Nick Hopgood, Mr. Clem Williams, Mrs. Mattie Tant, Mrs. Naomi Williams, Mrs. Annie Jackson, Mrs. Cora Lee May, and the whereabouts of Mr. Frank Edwards is questionable. The living are: Mr. and Mrs. Lummie Bridges.

The Sunday School was organized in March, 1944, before the church was organized. The prayer meeting began October 7, 1945. The Daniels Cottage prayer band, that was named by Mrs. Tommy Sudden and began under the direction of Rev. Tommy Sudden and was started in 1947, was held on Sunday nights originally, but has been changed to Saturday nights in more recent years.

It was near the year of 1948 that Mr. Joe Peace Jenkins gave the lot on which the present church building was erected, and the first service in this church was October 3, 1948; but full-time service did not begin until 1955.

In March of 1955, Rev. A. W. Icard resigned the church, and the Rev. Bob Clegg supplied until the Rev. W.C. Barham came on June 26, 1955 and was pastor until October 27, 1957. After the leaving of Rev. Barham, different ministers supplied until the Rev. Marvin Dameron came to Union View in January 1958 and remained until July 25, 1965. Upon the departure of Rev. Dameron, the Rev. Robert Brooks supplied until the Rev. Glenn Short was called in September 1965. Rev. Short served until 1970. After others supplied the pulpit, Rev. Joe Wren was called as pastor in 1971. He served the church until 1974. Again others supplied the pulpit until Rev. Larry Boswell was called as pastor in 1975. He served the church until August 1978. The Rev. Norman Baird, a native of Ireland, served as interim pastor from that point until June 1979. At this time, the church called Rev. David Schell as pastor. Following Rev. Schell's resignation, Rev. Bob Sherrill was called as pastor. After his resignation, our present pastor, Rev. Ed Revelle was called.

Through the planning and organization of both the pastors and members of the church Union View has experienced a rapid growth since 1944. In addition to the growth mentioned, a W.M.U. was started by Mrs. Marvin Damerson and Mrs. Rosa Colbert, and has grown to include a G.A 's, Y.B.W.'s, Acteens, and Baptist Women. A Royal Ambassador program has also been added. In addition, there have been four ministers that have gone out from the church: Rev. F.G. Alford, Rev. H.D. Harris, Rev. Reid Winstead, and Bobby Ray Harris, with two ministers within the church, James Weaver and Perry Jordon.

It was in 1962 that the two rooms and vestibule, installation of windows and purchasing of an organ and the bricking of the church was completed. In 1963, the church organized a mission at the county jail and the Pine Rest Home. In May of 1967, the parsonage was moved to Franklin Street.

In more recent years, some Sunday School rooms have been renovated and a fellowship hall has been added. A nice sound system has also been installed, and the church has been incorporated.

Our present Music Director is Mr. Tommy McGhee.

ARTICLE XI - ORDAINING COUNCIL

Present Wording:

- A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership, and the request from the church come to the Association through the Moderator or the Association office.
- D. That the council then proceed in the usual Baptist method and policy for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

Proposed Constitutional Change:

- A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership, and that the request from the church come to the Association through the Chairman of the Ordaining Council or the Associational Office.
- D. That the Council then proceed according to the approved guidelines for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

Our Annual Spring Workshop was held at Spring Hope Baptist Church on September 14, 1987 with 129 present. Information and ideas were shared on how we can be a more effective WMU in our church and reach more people for Christ.

One of our mission action projects for the coming year is giving toothpaste to the North Carolina Correctional Center for Women as a gift for Christmas. A goal of 200 tubes was set for our Association. Many of the WMUs have already responded very generously and we have received 102 tubes so far.

Executive Committee Report

The Exeuctive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the last semiannual meeting.

JUNE 8, 1987

Moderator for the session was Rev. Gary Anderson. Fifty-three were present from 24 churches. Terry Alford, Chairman of the Finance Committee, made the following recommendations and motions concerning the balance of money left over from the budgeted item Legal Defense Fund: (1) Motion that the secretary's salary be \$5,200.00 per year and Social Security \$728.00. Motion carried; (2) Motion to delete utilities line in 1987 budget and change to two lines reading \$4,000.00 housing allowance and \$2,302.71 Utilities for Associational Center. Motion carried; (3) Motion that the Association authorize Sam Wood's name be placed on the signature card along with Maylon Frazier in order to carry on business of Association when Maylon has to be away. Motion carried; (4) Motion to adopt the New Expanded Annuity Plan for our Director of Missions. Motion carried; (5) Recommendation that we encourage our churches to seriously consider 4 percent for associational missions as we prepare budgets for 1988.

The treasurer's report was presented and accepted. Mr. Gerald Nelms, secretary of the Missions Council presented the following recommendations: (1) That the offering to be taken during the Week of Prayer for Associational Missions in August be used to purchase a computer and soft ware for use in the Association Office and that any excess funds be applied to the building fund for the new office to be built in Louisburg. Motion made, seconded and carried; (2) Recommendation that we install a sign on our property in Louisburg indicating the location of the future office center of the Tar River Baptist Association. Motion made, seconded, and carried.

Rev. Bill Wallace gave his report, shared with the group a growth chart, and made several announcements concerning up-coming events.

Dr. Ray Pruett and Mr. Joe Elmore brought an up-to-date report from the History Committee. They asked for help in promotion of the history and in getting churches to help budget some money to finance the printing. A possible suggestion was \$140.00 per church.

Dr. Harry Kahn made the following motion from the Ordination Council: The Tar River Ordaining Council moves the adoption of the ordination guidelines that we have been operating under the past one and one-half years and request that the Constitution and Bylaws committee amend Article XI of the Bylaws to incorporate the use of these guidelines. Motion seconded and carried.

Rev. Gary Anderson expressed thanks to the group for the support and letters to the Louisburg Town Council in getting our property rezoned. Meeting was adjourned with prayer by Dr. Harry Kahn.

SEPTEMBER 28, 1987

Moderator for the session was Rev. Gary Anderson. Nineteen churches were represented with 53 in attendance. Rev. Anderson reported that the sign to be placed on our property in Louisburg is ready and will be up soon. He appointed the following people as members of our Building Committee: Frances Fuller, Corinth Church; James Horton, Fishing Creek Church; Gerald Nelms, Sandy Creek; Johnny Alford, Pilot Church; and one more person will be named at a later date.

Mrs. Emily Creech reported 129 ladies were present representing 25 churches at the WMU fall workshop at Spring Hope. She announced that Tar River WMU is participating in a mission action project of giving toothpaste to the North Carolina Correctional Center. Our goal is 200 tubes.

The treasureer's report was presented and accepted. Attention was called to list of churches and amounts received for special funds for office equipment and for printing of our history.

Mr. Terry Alford presented the following from the Finance Committee: (1) Motion that we adopt the printed budget for 1988 in the amount of \$63,900.36. Motion seconded and carried. (2) Recommendation that \$5,000.00 be set aside and placed into a separate account known as "Tar River Association Building Fund." Motion made, seconded and carried.

Mr. Gerald Nelms presented the following from the Missions Council: (1) Recommendation that a vote of approval be given to continue the Sunday School ministry at Lake Royale on a year-round basis with services to be headed up by Rev. Roger Plemmons of Cypress Chapel, our Mission Action Committee Chairperson. Motion made to accept, seconded and carried. Rev. Plemmons spoke to the group concerning this ministry and asked for prayer and the support of the other churches in the Association. (2) Recommendation that we participate in a World Missions Conference during October 1988. Motion made to accept, seconded and carried. Rev. Wallace spoke to the group and explained what would be involved from our churches. (3) Recommendation that we participate in the North Carolina-Brazil Partnership and that we send our Director of Missions and one lay person in November to work out details with the Brazilian Association. Motion made to table this motion until later in the meeting. Seconded and carried.

Mr. Gilford Bufkin, chairman of the Credentials Committee made the following recommendation: "Our Credentials Committee has met and examined the Oak Grove Baptist Church and a recommendation will be made at the Semi-Annual meeting in October that we accept them in the Tar River Baptist Association."

Rev. Bill Wallace presented a copy of his report to the group. (See his report in minutes). He encouraged the churches that have not taken part in the special offering for our association to do so as soon as possible. He reported only four churches have joined the New Expanded Annuity Plan and we needed to get this done by January 1, 1988.

Mr. Gerald Nelms was recognized again to present the following from the Missions Council: (1) Recommendation that we adopt the calendar for 1988 as printed. Motion made, seconded and carried. (2) Recommendation that we adopt the San Remon Indian Village Church in Belize, Central America as a Tar River project. After second, Gary Anderson explained that we only needed a commitment at this time to help these peoplethe involvement of time and money would come at a later time, but that we would be participating financially in the estimated amount of \$15,000. After much discussion, a motion was made by Dr. Harry Kahn that we delay making a decision on this project until our semi-annual meeting in October. Motion was seconded and carried.

Rev. Gary Anderson brought the motion that was tabled earlier in the meeting back to the floor concerning the North Carolina-Brazil project. He explained this project to the group with details of how the money would be raised to support two people to go in November. He suggested a love offering in our churches on October 18 and also that an offering would be taken at the meeting on October 19. Gary explained that the Convention would vote on this project at the Baptist State Convention in November and that if it does not pass, of course, this would be resolved. Motion carried.

Rev. Jim Moynihan, new pastor at Sandy Creek, was introduced and welcomed to Tar River Association. Rev. Norris Cook expressed appreciation from Hopkins Chapel Church for the prayer support during the long period with the law suits. He announced that the lawyers were able to settle out of court. Motion was made to adjourn following prayer by Rev. Bill Wallace.

Director of Missions Report

It has been my privilege to attend services in 36 of our 44 churches, preaching in most of them. A personal goal that I have set is to try to attend a service in each of our churches before the end of the year.

I have learned a number of things as I have traveled and worked as Director of Missions. First, TRBA is made up of some of the finest people in the entire world. Second, TRBA is a fellowship of good churches with capable leadership. Third, TRBA is mission-minded and involved in mission activities. Fourth, TRBA has before her open doors of mission opportunities that have not yet been entered. Fifth and finally, TRBA will be limited in missionary and evangelistic outreach only by the limitation she places upon herself.

My plans and goals as your Director of Missions are as follows: (1) To try to get to know and be friends with as many Tar River Baptists as possible. (2) To strive to enrich and enliven our fellowship while being a facilitator to help and encourage our good churches to become better churches. (3) To endeavor to enlarge our missionary vision and to increase our involvement in mission ministries and activities. (4) To be alert and sensitive to new mission needs and to keep mission opportunities constantly before us. (5) To help Tar River Baptists discover shackles that hinder or limit us and ways to break those shackles so we can be free to do and be all that God wants us to do and be.

Three large opportunities are immediately before us - (1) Construction of a new Associational Center, (2) The North Carolina/Brazil Partnership, and (3) The construction of a church in southern Belize in Central America. To undertake all of these projects and move them along simultaneously may seem to some to be a bit too ambitious and aggressive. May I remind you that all things are possible with God. Please remember also that a part of what you have called me here to do is to discover mission needs and to help develop strategies to meet those needs. I believe that TOGETHER we can do it - I mean, ALL of it. Please know, however, that I will not take it personnally should TRBA decide for any reason that we cannot or should not walk through one or more of these doors. We are in this thing together. We need each other. What we agree on and vote to do will always be OUR program. My prayer and plea is that our missionary and evangelistic programs always be ambitious and aggressive so as to challenge us to do and give our best. What a shame it would be to do nothing because we attempt nothing. I think that would also be a big disappointment to God.

I love the Tar River Baptist Association - its people, its churches, and its church leaddership. I'm proud to be Director of Missions for this fine association of churches. Please pray that God will use me and make my ministry effective.

Baptist Foundation Report

You might call Frank Neville handicapped. He spends most of his time in a wheelchair. But he denies that he is handicapped, and instead has utilized his limited mobility as opportunity to witness. Each day he invites neighbors and acquaintances, one at a time, into his home for coffee. There he talks with them about Jesus, and Frank has been thrilled and amazed at their expressions of appreciation for his concern for their spiritual welfare.

Frank has determined that he will never stop witnessing, and his financial and estate plans have been so prepared as to insure that he will always be a part of winning the lost to Christ. He transferred valuable land into trust with the Baptist Foundation. Until his death, he will receive income earned by the trust. After that time, all income will be paid to Carolina Baptist Association to be used for Spanish mission ministries; scholarships for youngsters to attend summer camp, for students studying for Christian vocations, and for persons going on volunteer mission trips; for training and resources for associational leadership; and for camp development. Frank Neville, like others who are faithful stewards now, wishes to continue that commitment when he is no longer here.

The Foundation promotes endowment of Christian causes with an assurance drawn from its experience with donors that such planning for the future in no way minimizes "now" witnessing and giving. Just the opposite has been the case; the faithful steward is faithful in every area. The statistics, dollars and facts of this report are truly about the people whose impassioned concern for mission and ministry has resulted in positive action.

In 1986, new trust agreements were prepared for 93 persons. Their gifts to initiate these trusts totaled \$1,181,288. Many of the agreements provide for and anticipate the addition of funds in the future; thus, it is difficult to assess the longterm benefit to Baptist work provided through the trusts. Assistance was given to dozens of persons in preparing their Wills, all of whom included trusts through their estates for nearly every cause supported by Southern Baptists.

One imaginative concept employed in several trusts and Wills has been "Give it Twice." A trustor provides that family members receive income earned by the trust until they have received an amount equal to the principal placed in trust. Then, after the family has received the full amount, the income thereafter is paid to Baptist causes selected by the trustor in the trust agreement. He has denied his family nothing! They have received it all. But the principal is still intact and the second time around the income will support Kingdom work.

Because of the 1986 tax reform legislation, certain types of trusts have taken on new significance. The Retirement Unitrust has become a vehicle for partially replacing the IRA. This trust is especially attractive for professional persons and others in middle years for supplementing other pension plans.

Many local churches chose to use the Foundation as trustee for funds which they were holding for future needs. Investment of those funds with the Foundation can, in some cases, result in greater income for the church. Conversely, since the funds are pooled and since churches can recall the funds, if they are withdrawn during a depressed market, principal returned to the church could be reduced. It is important that churches recognize that the Foundation's first objective is to assist individuals in estate stewardship. The motivation for using the Foundation must be the making of a gift to a Baptist cause. The Foundation does not operate as a bank or investment institution. However, one exciting realization for the church is that investment through the Foundation allows their funds to be a part of "family" and to be available for "family" use, if they desire. In corporation with the state convention, the Foundation established in the last year a credit line of \$3,000,000 for church loans. The Board of Directors took action to implement recommendations of its study committee, resulting in addition to the staff of a director of administration to direct the church loan and student loan programs, as well as trust management. The Board also approved construction of office facilities for the Foundation near the Baptist Building, with plans to begin construction in September, 1987.

Assets of the Foundation have increased to more than \$13,000,000. These dollars are expressions of concern made by Baptist stewards. They are the very same persons who, like Frank Neville, witness and give daily, that the lost, the needy, the hurting people of the world might know Jesus.

The Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc.

The year 1986-87 has been an exciting time in the life of the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. Charged with the task of providing quality living opportunities for older adults within a Christian context, the "Homes" has this year attempted to "move forward" in three broad directions.

I. Advocacy for Older Adults

During 1986-87, the "Homes" has endeavored to become an advocate, a spokesman, for a very special segment of the state's population...the Older Adult. Appearing before church, associational, and convention groups throughout the state, the "Homes" and staff have attempted to sensitize Baptists to the particular needs of Older Adults as well as the significant contribution they can make to the wellbeing of the churches and associations of the Baptist State Convention.

II. Quality Care

During the year 1986-1987, the "Homes" has continued to develop creative ways to meet the needs of Older Adults. For example, a significant new relationship has been established between the "Homes" and the Geriatric Section of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine (Wake Forest University). Mary Lyles, an attending physician in the Department of Medicine, has been appointed the "Homes" Medical Director. As a result of this new relationship, the "Homes" will be able to offer "sub-acute" care as well as intermediate and skilled nursing to its residents and patients.

In an attempt to provide quality care opportunities to Older Adults who still reside in the local community setting, a respite or temporary care program has been begun at the Albemarle Home. Quality care, long the hall-mark of the "Homes" is still the institution's main objective.

III. During 1986-1987, plans for institutional expansion and new development have moved forward at a rapid pace. "Ground-breaking" for a new Continuing Care Retirement Community in Winston-Salem will take place in the fall. The Homes' long-range plan includes the development of similar facilities in Asheville, Charlotte, and the East.

The "Good News of Jesus Christ" is the presupposition upon which the "Homes" operates. In reaching out in service to Older Adults, the "Homes" offers concrete expression to the love of the Christ for all people. The support of North Carolina Baptists makes this ministry of love possible.

Christian Action League

The General Assembly adjourned its 1987 session on August 14 marking the first time in North Carolina's history for the legislature to last into August. Normally, the body concludes its work by July 4.

One of the reasons for the session to last as long as it did was due to the "rash" of liquor bills along with gambling initiatives. Longtime legislative veterans stated that this session had more bills to liberalize our liquor law than ever. With the liquor lobbyists and gambling proponents working over-time, no wonder this session went on and on and on.

A major victory can be claimed by the defeat of the statewide lottery proposal. Due to Virginia's recent passage of such a bill, the heat from the gambling industry was evident. With opposition to the proposal coming from Governor James G. Martin, Lt.

Governor Robert B. Jordan, and House Speaker Liston B. Ramsey, the bill died in a Senate Committee.

However, the gambling industry did not fold up its tent and go home. A pari-mutuel gambling bill, Senate Bill 732, is still alive. Its sponsor, Senator Kenneth Royall, was able to get the measure held over until the 1988 legislative session. This proposal will open the door for horse and dog gambling tracks.

Your association needs to pass a resolution opposing Senate Bill 732, the pari-mutuel gambling proposal. Send copies to Governor James G. Martin, Lt. Governor Robert B. Jordan, III, and to your State House and Senate members.

In the war against pornography, we have special reasons to be thankful. The North Carolina Supreme Court has recently upheld the constitutionality of our 1985 Comprehensive Obscenity and Child Protection Act. The "smut peddlers" have contested this statute in both the state and federal courts. Each time the courts have ruled in support of the measure. Prior to the enactment of this nationally acclaimed law, North Carolina was known as the nation's porn capital with more porno outlets per capita than any other state. We have gone from some 750 pornography outlets to less than 50. No longer do you find sexually oriented publications available and accessible to children in convenient stores, etc.

The porn industry hasn't thrown the towel in either. There will be more court cases. In the current session of the North Carolina General Assembly, an effort was made to "gut" our obscenity statute. Rep. Ivan Mothershead of Mecklenburg County sought to insert into our law a provision to apply a state-wide standard rather than a community standard. Of course, that innocent sounding wording would have rendered our obscenity statute unconstitutional. The United States Supreme Court in its 1973 landmark case, Miller vs. California, set forth as a basic test in determining obscenity was the applying of a contemporary "community" standard rather than a "state-wide one." This reveals the importance of what one word could do to a good law. We are grateful that Rep. Mothershead was unsuccessful in his attempt.

Rep. Mothershead sought to repeal our newly enacted age 21 drinking law, but he was unsuccessful in that attempt. Of course, the beer industry was behind that effort, but the loss of federal highway funds for North Carolina highway building projects was more than the legislators were willing to tackle. If Mothershead would have been successful, the state would have had to pass a considerable increase in motor fuel taxes. This might have been the reason behind his effort to raise gasoline taxes.

The Christian Action League not only has been on the "firing line" during this legislative session. We have assisted in successful campaigns involving liquor, beer and wine referendums in places like Pasquotank County, Hudson, Lenoir, Banner Elk, Manteo, Franklin and King.

Thank you for standing with us in the ministry of applied Christianity. Through your prayers and financial support, you help us to be an effective applicator of "salt and light."

A recent survey sent to more than 24,000 lay persons and pastors in North Carolina, revealed strongly positive attitudes toward Baptist colleges.

The following summary of the survey's conclusions will interest our Baptist people in the churches and associations:

- 1. Almost 99 percent of those surveyed said Christian education should remain a high priority in North Carolina Baptist life.
- 2. More than 80 percent rated North Carolina Baptist colleges as outstanding or good. Ninety-five percent believe the quality of education is equal or superior to an education at a state school.
- 3. The three main strengths of Baptist schools, according to the survey, are the quality of education offered, the Christian commitment of faculty and the spiritual emphasis on the campuses. The overwhelming weakness is the cost.
- 4. Most said they learned about the colleges through the *Biblical Recorder*. The opinion was strong, however (65%), that Baptist students do not receive sufficient information about Baptist colleges through the local church.
- 5. When asked about the percentage of Cooperative Program funds for Christian education, 45.5 percent answered that it is "About right," while 37.8 percent replied the percentage is "Not enough."
- 6. Respondents to the survey were 29 percent women and 40 percent lay persons.

Eighty-four percent were from churches with memberships between 100 and 999. Such positive attitudes encourage Baptist colleges to excel even more in service and cooperation with Baptist churches.

MORE ABOUT NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST COLLEGES

One Baptist leader has said that Baptist colleges deserve the "Light Under the Bushel Award." He meant, of course, that many of the finest, most interesting stories about Baptist colleges are not widely known.

Everyone connects Baptist colleges and a superior experience in Christian education. Most would agree that there are other strong advantages for Baptist students who attend a North Carolina Baptist college. When young people and their parents are choosing a college together, here are some things to consider:

THE TIME: Life after high school is still a time for growing, maturing, learning and planning for a full life as an adult. Going to college in a Christian environment can make a world of difference for a lifetime. The first experiences after leaving home can shape a life forever.

THE SIZE: All of the Baptist colleges in North Carolina are small and manageable. You can easily walk anywhere on campus. No one is overwhelmed by a "megaversity" environment. A new student, fresh from high school, does not get lost in the crowd. Classes are small. Teachers can know the names and faces of students, and are available to advise and counsel between classes. A LASTING FAMILY: Many years after graduation, former students still visit and write letters to favorite professors. Cherished friends in college often remain friends for a lifetime. More often than not students will choose a husband or wife while on a college campus. These are only some of the advantages of a Baptist college community of caring people.

THE CALL TO CHRISTIAN SERVICE: In Baptist colleges the ideal of service to others remains strong in vocational planning. A sense of calling to a variety of service/leadership areas is emphasized, including church-related vocations. In a "me first" world, Baptist colleges are different in important ways.

PREPARING FOR LIFE: Christian education prepares students for making a living. But more importantly, Christian education is the best preparation for spending a life. An excellent, broad-based education provides a sound foundation for a person's last job, as well as the first.

THE ROLL CALL OF BAPTIST COLLEGES

There are six educational institutions supported financially by the Baptist State Convention: Campbell; Chowan; Gardner-Webb; Mars Hill; Meredith; and Wingate.

Wake Forest, our oldest school, has a continuing "fraternal and voluntary" relationship with North Carolina Baptists and the Council on Christian Higher Education.

North Carolina Baptist Hospital Report

During the past year, Baptist Hospital admitted 22,973 patients for a total of 186,321 days of patient care. More than 1,000 of those patients had heart surgery and 27 received kidney transplants. During this period, the hospital also performed its first heart transplant and, as of June 1, 1987, has performed four successful heart transplants.

Approximately 1,000 persons with kidney stones have been treated with the lithotripter. The lithotripter has also been used to break up gallstones. Baptist Hospital was the first hospital in the United States to achieve this success.

The Air Care Program, described as "a flying emergency room staffed with highly trained pilots and flight nurses," continues to save lives and to contribute to more rapid and complete recovery for many victims of trauma. For example, Air Care made it possible for a man whose arm was severed in a hay mowing accident to reach the hospital in time to have his arm reattached.

Baptist Hospital is one of less than a half dozen medical centers in the nation routinely transplanting living bone tissue. A woman underwent this rare procedure to correct an arthritic condition in her hip where her bone tissue had died. Bone tissue with its own blood supply was successfully transplanted from her lower legs to the upper end of the right femur.


In addition to those admitted to the hospital, 30,726 persons were seen in the outpatient clinics, 35,134 in the emergency department, and 196,556 in the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics. A total of 2,747 patients had outpatient surgery.

During the past year, the Pastoral Care Department has continued to provide pastoral services for hospital patients, pastoral counseling, clinical pastoral education, and human enrichment events. In addition, the department, in cooperation with the Baptist State Convention, has offered the "Pastor's Sabbath" Program at Caraway Conference Center and has provided assistance to more than 100 pastors and their families through the Minister's Care Plan. Plans are being made to offer training in "Conflict Management," "Healing of Corporate Pain," and "Ministry to the Interim Church."

Due to the change in the method and timing of the special offering, Baptist Hospital received during its past fiscal year the largest offering from the churches in its history. The last North Carolina Missions Offering in September of 1985 and the first Homes and Hospital Offering in May of 1986, together with designated gifts, brought the hospital a total of \$474,662.00. Cooperative Program gifts to the hospital during the same fiscal year was \$608,389.00, making our total receipts from the churches \$1,083,051.00.

For these gifts and for all other continuing support and help from the Baptist churches, the hospital trustees, staff and patients are deeply grateful.



Constitution

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

ARTICLE III — MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet biannually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring season

ARTICLE IV — RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V — DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; messengers; give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter, these to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches, and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII - OFFICERS

The officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer (with the privilege of combining the office of Clerk and Treasurer), Auditor, Historian, Trustees, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Stewardship Chairman, Chairman of the Social Services Committee, and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee. The Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Clerk, the Historian, the Trustees, the Chairman of the Social Services Committee and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence at the conclusion of the session. The Treasurer and the Auditor shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence on January 1. The Sunday School Director, the Church Training Director, the Music Director, the Chairman of Evangelism and the Stewardship Chairman are to be elected in the spring meeting of the association and their terms of office shall commence upon election. The above officers shall be elected annually. At such times as the Association shall elect a Director of Missions, he becomes an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII — DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, to enforce the rules, to preserve order, and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also serve as ex officio chairman of the Executive Committee of the Association. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, to serve as Vice Chairman of the Executive Committee and to serve as Chairman of the Missions Committee.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the body, and use all diligence in having same printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible, to mail the church clerks reminders by church letters forthcoming and to keep on hand the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body. He shall also serve as ex officio secretary of the Executive Committee.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse the monies contributed for the expenses of the body as authorized by the Executive Body.

E. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and report to the Association annually.

F. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and to report at the annual session of the Association.

G. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to respond, within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Association.

H. It shall be the duty of the Associational Church Training Director to promote the interests of Church Training within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

I. It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Director to promote the interests of the Sunday Schools within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

J. It shall be the duty of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director to promote the interests of the Woman's Missionary Union within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished. This officer's election may be a confirmation of election by the Associational Woman's Missionary Union.

K. It shall be the duty of the Associational Brotherhood Director to promote interests of the Brotherhood within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

L. The Associational Music Director shall plan and direct the music for all meetings of the Association and its Executive Committee and shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music in the churches of the Association.

M. Three (3) Trustees shall be elected from the membership of the Association to hold title of all property of the Association, to act under the direction of the Association through its Executive Committee to execute necessary legal documents, and to supervise the maintenance of all property belonging to the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive by purchase, gift or otherwise title to real and personal property and to see, convey or mortgage same for the use and benefit of said Association and its officers and agents upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of said Tar River Association.

The Trustees shall also be responsible for and keep an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association. An additional copy of this inventory shall be filed with the Treasurer and at the Associational office.

Trustees are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

N. It shall be the duty of the Associational Stewardship Chairman to both encourage and keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the stewardship of the total Christian life and witness. He shall make an annual progress report to the Association.

O. The Moderator shall appoint the Parliamentarian at each session of the Association and/or Executive Committee meeting.

ARTICLE IX - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Associational officers as set forth in Article VII, Director of Missions, Moderator for the past year, along with key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Committee members shall be members of the church they represent. If your church does not have all these leaders, you may appoint a representative for a committee prior to the regular Fall Annual Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Directors of Missions is an ex officio member of the Executive Committee and does not have the power to vote.

C. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

- 1. The Executive Committee of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary and to define his duties.
- 2. To act for the Association between regular sessions of the body.
- 3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.
- 4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
- 5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the annual budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.
- 6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Committee in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

ARTICLE X — OTHER COMMITTEES

The following committees whose duties are prescribed below shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new committee will take office.

A. NOMINATING COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to nominate the members of the various committees and chairmen and Associational officers deemed necessary to facilitate the work of the Association. The Nominating Committee will be appointed hereafter by the Moderator of the Association. This committee shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to provide the Association with authority for operation to determine the extent of the powers of the Association and to examine Articles of Faith and recommend the admission of new churches to the Association. It is the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association by badges as voting members of the Association.

C. FINANCE COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to propose a budget to the Executive Committee and to suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. The committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. This committee shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as ex officio member of this committee.

D. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to receive all resolutions presented to the Association.

This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting, officers of the Association, etc.

E. TIME, PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational meeting.

F. MISSIONS COMMITTEE composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Chairman, Stewardship Chairman, and three (3) members at large, whose duty will be to assist the Director of Missions in the planning, promoting, and execution of Associational programs, making recommendations to the Executive Committee. G. PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association whose duty shall be to receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Missions Committee Chairman, Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form, for the sessions of the Association, which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business. The host pastors shall be included in this committee.

H. CONSTITUTIONAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes.

I. SOCIAL SERVICES COMMITTEE shall be composed of one representative each of the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Homes for Aging and Baptist Hospital whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of these institutions.

J. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of a Christian Literature representative, a Christian Education representative, and one member at large whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

ARTICLE XI - ORDAINING COUNCIL

In order to preserve the Baptist position with reference to the divine call to the ministry, and to recognize the responsibility of a local church to the entire Baptist denomination, the Association shall elect annually an ordaining council that may act in an advisory capacity for churches seeking its assistance. In setting up this council and in its work, the following things are to be noted:

A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership, and that the request from the church come to the Association through the Chairman of the Ordaining Council or the Associational Office.

B. That the church in which the candidate holds membership elect to the council three members, one of them the pastor, provided he is not the candidate for ordination.

C. That the Tar River Association elect six members to constitute a standing ordaining council, to serve with the three members appointed by the local church, one of which shall be designated chairman by the Moderator. These shall serve terms of three years, and shall be ineligible to succeed themselves.

D. That the Council then proceed according to the approved guidelines for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

E. That we encourage insofar as it is practical public ordination services.

F. That the Tar River Association furnish the minister thus set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry by this council with credentials signed by the Moderator and Clerk of the Association and by each member of the Council.

ARTICLE XII – VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XIII - AMENDMENTS

This Constitution of the Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment(s) will be presented to afternoon session and voted on no earlier than evening session.

ARTICLE XIV - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

Bylaws

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. Any resolution to be presented to the Executive Committee and/or semiannual Associational Meetings, must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Association and published in the Associational newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.

10. Reports of committees on Convention objects must be brief - that on missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

13. The Clerk and Treasurer shall receive honorariums to be determined by the Executive Committee for their services as an expression of appreciation.

14. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

AFTERNOON SESSION

THEME: "Growing Together in Missions and Evangelism"

(Note from Clerk: Reports are not printed in the Proceedings. The reports are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

1. The 158th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by Mr. Terry Alford, Moderator.

2. Rev. Steve Kegley led the opening hymn, "Bring Them In."

3. Rev. David Story, pastor of Peachtree Baptist Church, read scripture from Psalms 20 and led the group in prayer.

4. The moderator reminded the messengers that the meeting would be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order* and that only duly elected messengers or alternates would be eligible to vote. Mr. Epp Cattlet was appointed to serve as parliamentarian.

TUESDAY EVENING SESSION October 25, 1988

Held at PILOT BAPTIST CHURCH Social Plains Baptist Church, Assisting

1. The 158th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Mr. Terry Alford, Moderator.

2. Rev. Steve Kegley led the opening hymn, "The Banner of the Cross."

3. Rev. Roger Hensley, interim pastor, Pilot Baptist Church led the devotion from Psalms 139.

4. The church histories were presented by Rev. Roger Hensley, Pilot Baptist Church, and Mrs. Nan Jones, Social Plains Baptist Church.

5. The following reports were presented as printed in the program: Baptist Hospital, Baptist Homes, Baptist Children's Homes, and Christian Education.

6. The Resolutions Committee Report was given by Dr. Mike Thompson as follows: "Whereas our Tar River Association has been invited by Peachtree, White Level, Pilot and Social Plains Baptist Churches to hold our annual meeting for 1988; Whereas all of those involved have done a commendable job in the planning, making this meeting informative, enjoyable and beneficial to our work: Therefore, be it resolved that we sincerely thank the members of Peachtree, White Level, Pilot and Social Plains Baptist Churches for their gracious hospitality. Be it further resolved that we thank all those involved at every step of the process which has made this meeting so successful.

Whereas Tar River Association has been experiencing growth in several areas of ministry; Whereas our leadership has developed and presented plans for continued ministry which expresses a great concern for the people of our region and a clear vision of the future; Therefore, be it resolved that we, the members of the Tar River Association, sincerely thank Rev. Bill Wallace, Terry Alford, and all other elected leaders for their contribution to our Association. Be it further resolved that we continue to prayerfully support our association and its leadership as we face the challenge and opportunities God has placed before us." Motion was made to adopt resolution as presented, seconded and carried.

7. Moderator Terry Alford presented the Time, Place and Preacher Committee Report as printed on page 17 of the program. Motion to accept, seconded and carried.

8. An offering was taken at this time to assist the association in expenses toward the NC/Brazil project.

9. Miscellaneous Business: Mrs. Elaine Lewis, Mission Action Director for Tar River WMU, made a motion that we set aside February 26 (Volunteer Missions Sunday) as the date for all our churches to take a love offering for our NC/Brazil project expenses. Motion was seconded and carried.

10. Rev. Steve Kegley opened the evening worship service with the hymn, "Take My Life and Let It Be."

11. The Franklinton Baptist Church Chancel Choir brought the special music for the worship service. Terry Alford expressed his sincere appreciation for the special music presented.

12. Rev. Bill Wallace was recognized to introduce our special speaker for the evening worship service. A sincere welcome was extended to Dr. Michael Blackwell, President of our Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. The title of his message was "Learning To Let Go Of The Past" with scripture coming from Luke 9:57-62.

13. Mr. Guilford Bufkin was recognized for the Credentials Report. He reported that Monday's session was represented by 39 churches with 124 messengers, 10 alternates, 29 pastors, seven associational officers, and eight guests. Tuesday nights session was represented by 33 churches with 73 messengers, two alternates, 22 pastors, eight associational officers and 25 guests. Total registration for the two days was 308.

14. Mr. Maylon Frazier adjourned the meeting with prayer.

History of Peachtree Baptist Church

Peachtree Missionary Baptist Church is located three miles North of Spring Hope on Highway 581, in the forks of the road. There has been a church in this area since before 1809. The first church meetings were held under a "bush arbor" near the present site. The first recorded building was called the "Moses Meeting House" in 1809. A church was built at Peachtree Grove in 1813 on land given by William "Billy" Hunt. This was a log house and the name was changed to "Peachtree Meeting House." In 1856, the church was remodeled or rebuilt. This same building burned on the last day of 1919 following a refurbishing and clean-up day. The next day, the first Sunday of 1920, the members voted to rebuild immediately. This building was removed to make room for the new brick structure which was dedicated in 1957.

Peachtree has been known as a mission-minded church for many years. In the 1930s the first mention was made in the minutes of a YWA being organized. This was a young women's missions group for people from age 7 to 70. As early as 1844, money was subscribed from the membership for the itinerant preacher. Again in the 1830s, plans were made to send out three missionaries from the Tar River Association, but the Civil War prevented this action. Besides being interested in mission areas outside the Peachtree Community, the church took an interest in beginning new churches in the general area. Peachtree Church was known as "The Mother of Churches" because ministers of the church began organizing churches in the surrounding communities. A number of strong churches exist today because of the dreams and visions of early Peachtree people. Peachtree is the oldest Missionary Baptist Church in continuous operation in Nash County. Records show that there have been 52 pastors and a number of interim pastors who also endeared themselves to us.

We have enjoyed a glorious history, but we understand that a great history should be looked at as a good foundation on which to build a bright future.

History of White Level Baptist Church

In the Gay Nineties, the only site of learning in our area was the old one-teacher "Sally Murphy School House." It was in this school building that the first Sunday School in this area was started. Due to the growth of the Sunday School, it was moved to a bush arbor in the yard of Mr. J.C. Collins on the Red Bud-Louisburg Road.

In early 1900, a post office was established in Mr. T.H. Dickens' store and a new three-room school was erected near the store. The Sunday School was held in the new school building. A revival was held and 64 persons were baptized in the old Tom House Mill Pond.

The Rev. John W. Sledge became interested in the community and was helpful in organizing a church assisted by George M. Duke, George W. Coppedge, and H.H. Mashburn. Eleven persons from Red Bud Baptist Church and 12 persons from Sandy Creek Baptist Church moved their membership to become the 23 charter members. Rev. Sledge was the first pastor at a salary of \$50 of which he gave back half to the church.

Later a church was built on two acres of land given by Mr. T.C. Collins, on which the present structure stands. In July 1911, the building was dedicated. Rev. Sledge suggested the church be called "White Level." The church was received into the Tar River Association in 1911.

During the past years, we have had wonderful pastors and laymen to lead and guide our church.

During World War I, 22 men were called into the armed services, all returning home safely.

The Woman's Missionary Union was organized in 1922 with Mrs. Mamie Dickens president. In 1925, the Baptist Young People's Union was organized. During this time, the steeple and bell were added to the church.

In 1928, the WMU started a building fund and gave the first \$325 to buy cement to make the blocks for our present building, which were made by men in the community.

On September 1, 1929, Ollie Jack Murphy was ordained to the ministry by White Level Church. He was educated at Wake Forest and Southern Seminary. He served as pastor in Tennessee and was serving as pastor of Penelope Baptist Church in Hickory, N.C. at his death on June 13, 1963.

During World War II, Rev. L.H. Hollingsworth was pastor. Fifty-six men were called to active duty, three of whom made the supreme sacrifice. Rev. Hollingsworth volunteered for service and served in the Pacific area. Rev. A.S. Lamm and Dr. Frank Lide served as interims. Services were held in the Junior Order Hall due to construction of the new building.

Mr. John Edwards served as pastor at one time, teaching school and pastoring eight other churches at the same time.

The church was finally completed, furnished, and dedicated. Mr. L.L Gupton laid the cornerstone for the new church building at the dedication.

Rev. T.H. Steen was pastor from 1949 to 1963. During this time a new educational annex was constructed, and Mr. Sal West gave a plot of land to be used as a building site for the parsonage. Rev. and Mrs. Steen were the first occupants in the parsonage in 1956.

In June 1961, Douglas Mitchell was called as choir director. He organized an adult choir, a youth choir, and a children's choir. Later, robes were purchased for the adult choir.

During the ministry of Rev. W.W. Porter, his only son, Stanley, died at the age of 10. He is buried in the White Level cemetery. The Porter family gave a number of hymnals to the church in Stanley's memory.

The church history is of special interest to the church with Mrs. Leona Dickens as librarian. "In Memorium Gifts" have been given by the families of Mr. Allan Nelms, Mr. B.T. Dorsey, and Mr. E.G. Brewer. These "In Memorium Gifts" have been a deciding factor towards the growth of the library. Since that time, many other books have been given in memory of other church members.

A Tape Recorder Ministry was initiated in February 1972. This ministry is instrumental in carrying the worship services to shut-ins and rest homes.

As a form of ministry, White Level conducts worship services in the area rest home each month.

On June 9, 1974, White Level licensed Ronnie West to the Christian ministry.

A public address system was installed in the church building during June 1974. The system has speakers in the nursery, the educational building, the sanctuary, and special earphones in selected pews for persons hard of hearing.

Rev. Kenneth Alstom resigned as pastor in 1976. The church was fortunate to have Dr. John Carlton serve as interim pastor until the church called Rev. Leon Warren in 1977.

The church paved the driveway and walks and installed a steeple in 1977. Since that time, a van has been purchased and new pews have been installed in the church.

In an attempt to broaden its ministry, the church instituted the Deacon Family Ministry Program and called Randy Bridges as Youth and Educational Director during 1981. Randy resigned in 1982, and Rev. Leon Warren resigned in 1983 to pastor White Oak Baptist Church in White Oak, North Carolina.

Rev. Tommy Preston served as pastor of White Level in 1984. In January 1986, the church called Reverend Kenneth Ashley as pastor. We have been and still are being blessed by Rev. Ashley's ministry in the service of our Lord. He has taught the following courses: MasterLife, Covenant Marriage, Parenting By Grace, and PrayerLife.

The church called John Rausch as Minister of Youth and Music in August 1986.

White Level is seeking to be used of God so that we will be inspired through worship, educated through Bible study, and dedicated through Christian living to love God and minister to our neighbors.

This history is dedicated to our forefathers and mothers who worked so diligently to organize a church for the benefit of future generations. Led by the Holy Spirit and inspired by the Lord, they paved the way for a rich and fruitful spiritual life for generations to come.

History of Pilot Baptist Church

Pilot Sunday School was organized before the church. The second Sunday in May 1888, L.H. Joyner and about 25 others met in a brush arbor across the road from the Lemmie Massey home and organized the Sunday School. The Sunday School continued until 1903 with no organized church. However, they had preaching and revival services fairly often with volunteer preachers bringing the messages.

In 1903, the church was organized, named Joyner's Chapel in honor of L.H. Joyner. In 1924, the name of the church was changed to Pilot because of confusion—some called it Joyner's Chapel and some Pilot—leaving the impression that there were two different churches. In 1904, the church was admitted to the Tar River Association. Reverend George Duke helped organize the church and was called as its first pastor. In the beginning, services were held in the old school house near the site of our present annex building.

In 1907, work was begun on the first church building, frame with 11 classrooms, and a sanctuary with seating capacity of 400. The present church building was begun in 1949 and finished in 1950 with 21 classrooms and a sanctuary with seating capacity of 450, including the balcony. In the fall of 1945 and spring of 1946, a ten-room parsonage was built. With much of the labor and material donated, actual cost of the building was \$13,500. In 1980, this house was sold and a new brick one built valued at \$101,000. Much of the labor was contributed on this parsonage also.

Early in 1953, the elementary school property (the present annex) was purchased along with 12 acres of land. Part of this building was set aside for social functions, and a calendar is kept by the church hostess. We also have Sunday School classrooms and a nursery in this building. The building is not idle during the week now. August 29, 1983, our Day Care Ministry was opened and operates in the annex. The grounds of this property are used mostly for recreation; with a picnic shelter, basketball and tennis courts, ball field, and play area for small children. The last appraisal in 1988 (insurance value) on all buildings, equipment, and furnishings was \$900,000.

Pilot's first report to the Association showed a membership of 102 with 100 enrolled in Sunday School. At the end of June this year, we had an enrollment of 329 with an average of 179 attending Sunday School. Total contributions in 1904 amounted to \$199.56; in 1956, \$9,883.81; in 1983 our budget was \$85,087; and in 1988 our budget is \$110,360.

The exact date of the organization of the first WMU in our church is not known, but it was organized by Miss Pearl Parker and Miss Annie Wilder. The first record of WMU work in the church is for the year 1912. There were 14 members in 1914. This organization has grown through the years. Along with the Brotherhood, the WMU has helped the membership become more aware of the mission work being done and of that which needs to be done. In recent years, our church has sponsored several missionary trips. Both the WMU and Brotherhood have good organizations on all age levels.

Our first senior choir was organized in 1949 by Cadwin Cone. At present, there are 23 members. Our first Minister of Music, Education and Youth was hired in 1969.

We have had a library since 1967 with lots of good books, many given as memorials. We have also had a part-time secretary since 1964.

On September 20, 1982, our church licensed Barry Jones, son of Carol and Alice Jones, to preach the gospel.

On April 17, 1983, our first Associate Pastor, Tim McQueen, was hired. He was also Minister of Youth. He served until August 1984.

Pilot Baptist Day Care Ministry was opened August 29, 1983. Present attendance is 70.

On July 7, 1985, we voted to call as our second Associate Pastor and Minister of Youth, Ron Galyon.

In August 1985, Mrs. Peggy Mooney served as a missionary in Togo, Africa.

On April 5, 1987, Anthony K. Ray was licensed to preach the gospel.

On March 1, 1987, Ron Galyon was ordained as Minister of the Gospel at Pilot Baptist Church.

Roger Hensley was called to be Associate Pastor and Minister of Youth in April 1987. On June 26, 1988, our pastor, Rev. Jesse Mooney, Jr., submitted his resignation

effective August 28. He is furthering his education at Campbell University.

On August 21, 1988, Articles of Incorporation were adopted.

Pilot Baptist Church has had 17 pastors and on August 28, 1988, we voted to hire Roger Hensley as interim pastor.

History of Social Plains Baptist Church

Social Plains Baptist Church, Route 5, Zebulon, North Carolina, was organized in 1883 with 12 charter members: Keuser, Calvin, Sidney, Bryant, John, Martha, Jane E., Mary A., and Lucy Alford; Phinuhus and Nancy Puckett, and S.B. Bunn.

The Hagwood family gave the land for the church to be built on. Church services were held on Saturday until 1921, when the membership had grown to 34, and a yearly budget to \$65.00. In 1935 the membership was 60 and the pastor's salary was \$30.29. The first missions offering was given this year.

In 1936 the church lost a number of members to the newly organized Union Hope Baptist Church. The next three years it looked as if the church would be disbanded, but the leadership of Pastor Julius Holloway helped the church stage a comeback in 1939. In 1940 the pastor's salary was increased to \$75.00 a year, and missions giving was increased. In 1950 a building fund was started with a \$500.00 budget. Under the leadership of Mrs. Rossie Jones, a WMU was organized on May 10, 1953, with 12 members.

In 1955 work was begun on the new church building. Materials and labor were donated by members and friends of the church. The sanctuary was completed in 1956 at a cost of \$6,050.00. The first service in the new building was held on Easter Sunday, April 8, 1956. The foundation for the educational building was laid on March 20, 1957. In 1958 the church borrowed money for the first time in its history to install the heating system and complete the educational building. The old church building was remodeled and turned into a community building in 1964. A fiberglass baptistry was installed in 1966.

The first GA Coronation Service was held in March 1967. Choir robes and an organ were also purchased that year. The pastorium was begun in September 1969 and completed in November 1972 at a cost of \$15,697. The church building was air conditioned in 1971. In 1974 an addition was built on the community building and two rest rooms added. Four new classrooms were added to the church in 1981. In October 1982, the church licensed its first candidate for the ministry, Charles Smith. On October 9, 1983, the church celebrated its 100th Anniversary.

The present total membership is 176. The budget for 1988-89 is \$31,920.00 with 10 percent of all income going to Cooperative Program and four percent to Associational Missions. Total value of church property is \$220,000.00.

Rhyner (1956-1959) Gene K. Hiers (1959-1963) Carroll Spivey (1963-1968) Eugene Hatcher (1968-1969) Ronald Rowe (1970-1972) Leslie H. Parrish (1972-1976) Bruce Martin (1977-1979) David E. Mills (1979-1984) Victor Blackwell (1984-1988) The churches of the Tar River Baptist Association believe in Sunday School. As of October 1987, there was an enrollment of 5,500 persons enrolled in Sunday School in our 43 Baptist churches. These numbers represent people who hear the Word, study the Word, and experience the love of Jesus Christ.

Our Spring VBS Clinic had a total of 14 churches participating with a total enrollment of 63 in attendance. Howbeit, 25 churches submitted VBS reports, which reflected a total enrollment of 1,772 with eight churches receiving the Merit Award and five churches receiving the Advance Award. To those of you who submitted reports, "Hats Off" to you for a job well done.

Our ASSISTeam participated in the ASSISTeam East Training offered this past year at F.B.C. of Cary where we trained to better help our local Tar River Baptist Association Sunday Schools. Then as a team, led the TRBA on September 19, 1988, in the study of the People Challenge Series of Sunday School Study. For that study, we had good attendance with a significant number of our churches participating. It was the best Sunday School Leadership Night that I have witnessed in several years.




Church Training Report

Woman's Missionary Union Report

DECEMBER 14, 1987

FEBRUARY 29, 1988

Moderator for the session was Terry Alford. Twenty-one churches were represented with 52 in attendance. The WMU Report was presented by Mrs. Emily Creech encouraging good attendance at several events coming up, expecially the WMU Annual Spring Meeting to be held at Louisburg, March 28, 1988.

Rev. Grady Edwards announced the VBS Clinic to be held at Pilot in May.

Motion was made by the Nominating Committee that Rev. Jesse Mooney be elected to fill the vacancy of Church Training Director. Motion seconded and carried. Rev. Mooney reported that the Children's Bible Drills would be held March 24 at Pilot Church with Pilot and Harris Chapel participating.

The Treasurer's Report was presented and accepted.

Rev. Harry Kahn reported that the new pastor of Perry's Chapel, Rev. Sammy Pearch, has been approved for ordination.

Mrs. Nan Jones expressed appreciation from Social Plains Church to those involved in the FIRST TAR RIVER RA BASKETBALL LEAGUE held recently. A banquet was held on February 18 for all the church teams that participated. Flat Rock RA's won the championship for the Junior High Division and Social Plains RA's won the championship for the Senior High Division. Pilot Senior High RA's represented Tar River in the State Play-off March 11-12, 1988. Meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Clark Rounds.

JUNE 27, 1988

Moderator for the session was Terry Alford. Forty-two were present from 19 churches. The new pastor, Rev. Marc Tilley was introduced and welcomed to Tar River. Terry Alford presented Bill Wallace's report due to his absence and shared with the group several items as follows: The last member of the Building Committee, Mrs. Linda Aycock, has been appointed and they will meet very soon; the new work has begun at Louisburg Manor and other churches are needed to help with this ministry; an official request for our first project in the NC/Brazil Partnership has been received for 10 teams to go in March 1989 and Mr. Wallace needs the approval of the association to lead the first team; plans for the World Missions Conference continue to run smoothly - but we need at least six more churches to participate; and the annual meeting is scheduled for October 24-25, 1988, at Peachtree Church and Pilot Church.

Reports were heard from Nan Jones, WMU Director, and Jesse Mooney, Church Training Director. Rev. Mooney reported that Harris Chapel competed in the state finals of Children's Bible Drills and came out very well.

Motion was made by Harvey Sharp to approve Bill Wallace to assume the responsibility for leading this group to Brazil. No other details except approval are included in this motion. Motion seconded and passed. Meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Jesse Mooney.

Mrs. Nan Jones gave the WMU Report indicating that the fall workshop was well attended by 110 ladies. The Missions Fair, October 15, was announced and all WMU leaders were encouragaed to support this event. Rev. Gary Anderson, RA Director, announced that the RA Banquet would be held during RA Week in November and information would be coming out on that soon. The Treasurer's Report was presented and approved as printed.

Mr. Gerald Nelms of the Building Committee reported that they are meeting and looking at plans. Any suggestions concerning our new office center should be sent to Bill Wallace. He asked for financial support of all our churches. Rev. Harry Kahn reported that the Ordination Council has met with Mickey Willard, pastor of Mount Zion Baptist Church, and he has been approved for ordination. Charles Orange will bring the missionary message for that service. A Missions Fair will be held at Louisburg Church on October 15 from 10:30-1:30 with all the missionaries taking part in this event. Plans for our Tar River Annual Meeting, October 24-25, 1988, were announced and good attendance was encouraged.

The 1989 Calendar of Events was presented to the group for approval. Motion was made by Rev. Harry Kahn to adopt the calendar as printed with additions if needed. Motion seconded and carried. Meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Mike Thompson.

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

Constitution

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet biannually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring season

ARTICLE IV — RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V — DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; messengers; give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter, these to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches, and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII - OFFICERS

The officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer (with the privilege of combining the office of Clerk and Treasurer), Auditor, Historian, Trustees, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Stewardship Chairman, Chairman of the Social Services Committee, and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee. The Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Clerk, the Historian, the Trustees, the Chairman of the Social Services Committee and the Chairman of the Christian Education Committee shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence at the conclusion of the session. The Treasurer and the Auditor shall be elected at the fall meeting and their terms of office shall commence on January 1. The Sunday School Director, the Church Training Director, the Music Director, the Chairman of Evangelism and the Stewardship Chairman are to be elected in the spring meeting of the association and their terms of office shall commence upon election. The above officers shall be elected annually. At such times as the Association shall elect a Director of Missions, he becomes an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII — DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, to enforce the rules, to preserve order, and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also serve as ex officio chairman of the Executive Committee of the Association. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, to serve as Vice Chairman of the Executive Committee and to serve as Chairman of the Missions Committee.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the body, and use all diligence in having same printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible, to mail the church clerks reminders by church letters forthcoming and to keep on hand the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body. He shall also serve as ex officio secretary of the Executive Committee.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse the monies contributed for the expenses of the body as authorized by the Executive Body.

E. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and report to the Association annually.

F. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and to report at the annual session of the Association.

G. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to respond, within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Association.

H. It shall be the duty of the Associational Church Training Director to promote the interests of Church Training within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

I. It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Director to promote the interests of the Sunday Schools within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

J. It shall be the duty of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director to promote the interests of the Woman's Missionary Union within the bounds of the Association, and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished. This officer's election may be a confirmation of election by the Associational Woman's Missionary Union.

K. It shall be the duty of the Associational Brotherhood Director to promote interests of the Brotherhood within the bounds of the Association and to make to the Association an annual report of the work accomplished.

L. The Associational Music Director shall plan and direct the music for all meetings of the Association and its Executive Committee and shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music in the churches of the Association.

M. Three (3) Trustees shall be elected from the membership of the Association to hold title of all property of the Association, to act under the direction of the Association through its Executive Committee to execute necessary legal documents, and to supervise the maintenance of all property belonging to the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive by purchase, gift or otherwise title to real and personal property and to see, convey or mortgage same for the use and benefit of said Association and its officers and agents upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of said Tar River Association.

The Trustees shall also be responsible for and keep an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association. An additional copy of this inventory shall be filed with the Treasurer and at the Associational office.

Trustees are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

N. It shall be the duty of the Associational Stewardship Chairman to both encourage and keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the stewardship of the total Christian life and witness. He shall make an annual progress report to the Association.

O. The Moderator shall appoint the Parliamentarian at each session of the Association and/or Executive Committee meeting.

ARTICLE IX — EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the Associational officers as set forth in Article VII, Director of Missions, Moderator for the past year, along with key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Committee members shall be members of the church they represent. If your church does not have all these leaders, you may appoint a representative for a committee prior to the regular Fall Annual Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Directors of Missions is an ex officio member of the Executive Committee and does not have the power to vote.

C. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

- 1. The Executive Committee of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary and to define his duties.
- 2. To act for the Association between regular sessions of the body.
- 3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.
- 4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
- 5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the annual budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.
- 6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Committee in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

ARTICLE X — OTHER COMMITTEES

The following committees whose duties are prescribed below shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new committee will take office.

A. NOMINATING COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to nominate the members of the various committees and chairmen and Associational officers deemed necessary to facilitate the work of the Association. The Nominating Committee will be appointed hereafter by the Moderator of the Association. This committee shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to provide the Association with authority for operation to determine the extent of the powers of the Association and to examine Articles of Faith and recommend the admission of new churches to the Association. It is the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association by badges as voting members of the Association.

C. FINANCE COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to propose a budget to the Executive Committee and to suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. The committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. This committee shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as ex officio member of this committee.

D. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to receive all resolutions presented to the Association.

This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting, officers of the Association, etc.

E. TIME, PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational meeting.

F. MISSIONS COMMITTEE composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Chairman, Stewardship Chairman, and three (3) members at large, whose duty will be to assist the Director of Missions in the planning, promoting, and execution of Associational programs, making recommendations to the Executive Committee. G. PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association whose duty shall be to receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Missions Committee Chairman, Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form, for the sessions of the Association, which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business. The host pastors shall be included in this committee.

H. CONSTITUTIONAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes.

I. SOCIAL SERVICES COMMITTEE shall be composed of one representative each of the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Homes for Aging and Baptist Hospital whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of these institutions.

J. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of a Christian Literature representative, a Christian Education representative, and one member at large whose duties shall be to keep before the churches all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

ARTICLE XI - ORDAINING COUNCIL

In order to preserve the Baptist position with reference to the divine call to the ministry, and to recognize the responsibility of a local church to the entire Baptist denomination, the Association shall elect annually an ordaining council that may act in an advisory capacity for churches seeking its assistance. In setting up this council and in its work, the following things are to be noted:

A. That no candidate for ordination be considered except upon the recommendation of the church with which he holds his membership, and that the request from the church come to the Association through the Chairman of the Ordaining Council or the Associational Office.

B. That the church in which the candidate holds membership elect to the council three members, one of them the pastor, provided he is not the candidate for ordination.

C. That the Tar River Association elect six members to constitute a standing ordaining council, to serve with the three members appointed by the local church, one of which shall be designated chairman by the Moderator. These shall serve terms of three years, and shall be ineligible to succeed themselves.

D. That the Council then proceed according to the approved guidelines for examining and recommending the candidate for ordination.

E. That we encourage insofar as it is practical public ordination services.

F. That the Tar River Association furnish the minister thus set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry by this council with credentials signed by the Moderator and Clerk of the Association and by each member of the Council.

ARTICLE XII – VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XIII - AMENDMENTS

This Constitution of the Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment(s) will be presented to afternoon session and voted on no earlier than evening session.

ARTICLE XIV - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

Bylaws

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. Any resolution to be presented to the Executive Committee and/or semiannual Associational Meetings, must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Association and published in the Associational newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.

10. Reports of committees on Convention objects must be brief - that on missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

13. The Clerk and Treasurer shall receive honorariums to be determined by the Executive Committee for their services as an expression of appreciation.

14. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

AFTERNOON SESSION

THEME: "Churches Laboring Together with God"

(Note from Clerk: Reports are not printed in the Proceedings. The reports are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

1. The 159th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:15 p.m. by Mr. Terry Alford, Moderator.

2. Rev. David Story led the opening hymn, "To God Be The Glory."

3. Rev. Jimmy Creech, pastor of Spring Hope Baptist Church, read scripture from Psalm 100 and I Corinthians 3:1-9 and led in the opening prayer.

4. The moderator reminded the messengers that the meeting would be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order* and that only duly elected messengers or alternates would be eligible to vote. Mr. Epp Cattlet was appointed to serve as parliamentarian.

10. The Memorial Service was led by Rev. Bill Wallace.

11. Rev. David Story led the group in singing "Great Is Thy Faithfulness."

12. Miscellaneous Business: Mr. Gilford Bufkin was recognized from the Credentials Committee with the following motions (See Credentials Report):

- (a) That the Community Baptist Church, Franklinton, NC, be received under the watchcare of Tar River Baptist Association for the period of one year, and after that into full fellowship with the Association. Motion was seconded by Eleanor Batchelor and carried unanimously.
- (b) That the Beulah Christian Church, near Rolesville, NC, be received under the watchcare of Tar River Baptist Association for the period of one year and after that into full fellowship with the Association. Motion was seconded by Randall Speer and carried unanimously.

13. The following Committee Reports were presented as printed in the program: Executive Committee, Evangelism Committee, Nominating Committee, Historian's Report, and Time, Place, Preacher Report.

14. The Installation of Officers was led by Mr. Terry Alford.

15. The afternoon worship service was opened by Rev. David Story leading the group in singing "Break Thou The Bread of Life."

16. Special music was presented by Mrs. Betty Lane Bissette.

17. The annual sermon was delivered by Rev. David Story, pastor of Peachtree Baptist Church. His scripture, Ezekiel 37:1-14 and John 3:8, was read by Rev. Andy Cook. 18. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Rev. Jimmy Creech.

EVENING SESSION

19. The evening session was opened with special music by a trio from Spring Hope Church, David Story, and our special guests visiting us from Brazil, Joel and Anna Ferreira. David Story led the group in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name." Rev. Bobby Trott read scripture from Psalm 85 and John 17.

20. The moderator expressed his appreciation to our music leaders for today's session, David Story, Nanette Warren, Betty Lane Bissette, Joel and Anna Ferreira, the ladies from Spring Hope, and to the organist and pianist. He also welcomed the following new pastors to the Association: Rev. Mike Harrell, Cypress Chapel; Rev. Bill Bussey, Stanhope; and Rev. Randall Speer, Social Plains.

21. The Treasurer's Report was presented by Mr. Terry Alford in absence of our treasurer.

22. The 1990 budget was presented. Motion was made by Dr. Harry Kahn that we adopt the budget as printed. Seconded by Mrs. Agnes Merrid and carried.

23. Mr. Terry Alford expressed appreciation to Mrs. Nan Jones for the past nine years of service to Tar River as clerk.

24. Rev. Bill Wallace was recognized for his report. (See printed report.)

25. Special music was presented by Mrs. Betty Lane Bissette.

26. Rev. Bobby Stafford, Baptist State Convention, presented the Strategy Planning Report from the Association Planning Committee. This report will be voted on at the Tuesday night session of our annual meeting.

TUESDAY EVENING SESSION October 24, 1989

1. Special music was presented prior to the meeting by Sandra Wood, Susan Parker, and Pam Faulkner along with Nanette Warren.

2. The 159th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Mr. Terry Alford, moderator.

3. Mrs. Sandra Wood led the opening hymn, "O Zion, Haste."

4. Rev. Arthur Kirk, pastor of Castalia, led the devotion from Philippians 1 and led in prayer.

5. The church histories were presented by Rev. Arthur Kirk, Castalia Baptist Church, and Mrs. Jack Avant from Fishing Creek Baptist Church.

6. The following reports were presented as printed in the program: Baptist Hospital, Baptist Homes, Baptist Children's Homes, and Christian Education. Mrs. Lou Russell from the Development Staff of the Baptist Children's Homes spoke briefly to the group.

7. The Resolutions Committee Report was given by Mr. Gerald Nelms as follows: "Whereas our Tar River Association has been invited by Spring Hope, Bailey, Castalia, and Fishing Creek Baptist Churches to hold our Annual Meeting for 1989; Whereas all of those involved have done a commendable job in the planning, making this meeting informative, enjoyable and beneficial to our work: Therefore, be it resolved that we sincerely thank the members of these churches for their gracious hospitality. Be it further resolved that we thank all those involved at every step of the process which has made this meeting so successful.

"Whereas Tar River Association has been experiencing growth in several areas of ministry; Whereas our leadership has developed and presented plans for continued ministry which expresses a great concern for the people of our region and a clear vision of the future; Therefore, be it resolved that we, the members of the Tar River Association, sincerely thank Rev. Bill Wallace, Terry Alford, and all other elected leaders for their contribution to our Association. Be it further resolved that we continue to prayerfully support our Association and its leadership as we face the challenge and opportunities God has placed before us.

"Whereas Tar River Association, in cooperation with Flat River Baptist Association and Cullom Baptist Association, is participating in the North Carolina Brazil Partnership missions project; Whereas our Director of Missions, Rev. Bill Wallace, moderator, Terry Alford, and many others have participated by trips to Brazil or financial support; Therefore, be it resolved that we thank all those who have taken part in the North Carolina/Brazil missions project. Be it further resolved that we continue to support this project that God has placed before us."

8. Rev. Bill Wallace introduced Rev. Bob Watson from the Baptist State Convention. Rev. Watson is the person designated to Tar River under the CARE program. He is available to any church in Tar River to help in any way needed.

9. Rev. Wallace also introduced Rev. Dick King of the Louisburg Baptist Church who is available to our churches for supply and interims.

10. Miscellaneous Business: Rev. Bill Wallace presented the 1990 Calendar for Tar River. Motion was made to adopt the calendar as printed. Motion seconded and carried.

Floor was opened for discussion and questions concerning the Strategy Planning Committee Report which was presented to our Annual Meeting on Monday evening. After much discussion and several questions of concern, Rev. David Story of Peachtree Church made the motion that we adopt the report as printed. Rev. Jimmy Pulliam seconded the motion. Vote was taken and motion carried.

11. Rev. Bill Wallace shared highlights from the Brazil trip along with several others who were a part of the team. They encouraged others to get involved in this project. Nanette Warren presented a slide presentation as her part of the Brazil presentation.

12. Following special music by Mrs. Sandra Wood, Joel and Anna Ferreira, who are visiting here from Brazil and worked with our team while they were in Brazil, were introduced to the group to speak. Together they brought a very inspiring message. They closed their message with prayer.

13. Mr. Gilford Bufkin was recognized for the Credentials Report. He reported that we had 39 of our churches represented; 143 messengers, 28 alternates, 27 pastors, nine associational officers, and 41 visitors had registered for the meeting.

14. Mr. Terry Alford expressed his appreciation for the opportunity to serve as moderator for the past two years and presented the gavel to our incoming moderator, Mr. Gerald Nelms, to close the meeting. The meeting was adjourned with prayer.



History of Spring Hope First Baptist Church

Spring Hope Baptist Church was chartered and organized on December 29 and 30, 1889, with four known charter members. At the Tar River Association in October 1890 Spring Hope reported 13 members and worship services once a month with Elder John A. Bridgers as pastor. Bridgers was ordained in 1891 and stayed with the local church until 1892. Worship services were held in an unused building in the downtown area. Planks were placed over nail kegs for seats. Later services took place in a one-room school building on Walnut Street where most community functions took place. Joint Sunday School was held there every Sunday afternoon for Baptists and Methodists alike.

The church had acquired by 1895 the property of Walnut Street where the present church facilities are located. A frame church was reported to the Association in 1895; the cost, \$700; seating capacity, 200; and members, 42. When the Tar River Association was divided in 1907-08 Spring Hope Church became a member of the Roanoke Association. A new brick church was erected in 1909-10 at a value of \$12,000.00 with a capacity of 500. Electric lights and a central heating system were enjoyed for the first time. Beautiful stained-glass windows were installed. This is the church that is still in use today. The first electric organ was purchased in 1937. The 50th Anniversary of the church was celebrated in 1939.

The baptistry was not installed until 1921-22. Prior to that baptisms were administered in Tar River near Webb's Mill. An education building was erected beside the church in 1950 and in 1955 a permanent parsonage was built at 309 Nash Street. The church was reunited with the Tar River Association in 1958. The sanctuary was renovated in 1960. The Putnam Room was enlarged, furnished with pews and renamed The Morgan Chapel.

The Church Library was initiated in December 1962. Beginning that year the church letter *Gabriel* was issued twice a month. The Tape Ministry was started in 1973 for the homebound. The newsletter, renamed *The Letter*, was issued weekly.

A new electric organ was purchased in 1976. The parking lot property was bought in 1981, the van and sound system in 1984, the grounds relandscaped in 1985 and in 1986 the church offices were moved from second floor to street level for easier access. They were refurnished and equipped appropriately. In the meantime a new tradition, "Hanging Of the Greens," had been initiated. Plexiglass was installed over the stained-glass windows and a stained-glass window was placed in the front of the baptistry in 1986.

The library was updated in 1987 and four brass chandeliers were installed in the sanctuary. Many memorial gifts have made the church more comfortable, pleasanter in

appearance and more conducive to deep spiritual worship. The music program has always been and continues to be excellent. All phases of the work of First Baptist Church are executed with Christian love, faith, prayer, support, and caring concern. Today there are 318 members: 225 resident and 93 non-resident.

In our Centennial Year we celebrate the firm foundations begun by so many in our first 100 years; and we look forward expectantly to our second 100 years of service and ministry in the Lord's name! God bless First Baptist Church as we seek to continue the ministry of Jesus Christ in our community through worship, Christian education and stewardship of life. Our mission is to help others come to know Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior and to grow and mature in His spirit.

History of Bailey Baptist Church

September 26, 1909 became a day to remember to Baptists in the Bailey area. On that day the Rev. J.W. Nobles, state missionary, J.H. Grice, and G.W. Finch met at Rock Springs Schoolhouse for the purpose of establishing a Missionary Baptist church. Presenting letters for membership were J.P. Underwood, Sr., R.L. Underwood, L.R. Finch, B.L. Taylor and daughter, Mrs. Ellen Finch, and Miss Mary Underwood.

Mr. Nobles was appointed moderator and clerk, and duly recorded the meeting. J.P. Underwood, Sr. was chosen deacon, with R.L. Underwood as clerk. Mr. Nobles agreed to remain as pastor until December of the same year. The Articles of Faith, Church Covenant, and Rules of Order taken from Pendleton's Church Manual were adopted. Thus was constituted the Missionary Baptist Church of Bailey, Nash County, North Carolina.

At the first conference held on October 17, 1909, the church voted to request membership into the Johnston Baptist Association, and was accepted the same month. A building committee was appointed and a church building was soon erected on what is now Highway 581.

During the early years of World War II as the need for expansion increased, our pastor, P.P. Hartsell led the church in a building program. The lot where our present church stands on Highway 264 was purchased from W.H. Farmer and Brothers for \$2,500. Two thousand of this sum was donated by W.H. Farmer and Brothers. The old church building was sold to Mr. B.M. Farmer, who converted it into an apartment called "Gospel Apartments."

Ground breaking for the education building and basement was held in 1947. Construction on the main auditorium was started in July 1950. In November 1956 the Bailey Missionary Baptist Church, with a membership of 168, was formally dedicated.

Plans for the pastorium were begun in 1957, and the building completed in 1959. Mrs. Mary High, the former Mary Underwood, charter member, donated a large portion of the money for this building. It was at this time that our church changed from the Johnston Baptist Association to the Tar River Baptist Association.

Pastors who have served our church in these years of expansion are: Revs. P.P. Hartsell, J.W. Davis, Frank Zedick, Clyde Yates, J. Monte Bishop, Charles Allard, Todd Walters, Charles Kratz, Jerry W. Turner, Shelby Stephens, John Owings and James W. Hales. While Rev. Jerry Turner was pastor, we began the first phase of a remodeling project. Jerry was a student at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary and served four years as pastor after he graduated. The remodeling project was completed while Rev. Shelby Stephens, also a student, was pastor. While Rev. James W. Hales was pastor, a Baptist Mission was started in an old restaurant building in Sims, North Carolina, August 1985. At the present time the Mission is considering becoming a church on its own. Tape ministries, monthly newsletters, young Baptist women organizations, Homebound Sunday School classes, Family Deacon Ministry Plan are some of our latest achievements. On September 25, 1988, Rev. Bobby G. Trott became our pastor.

In October 1989 T.R. (Pete) Stone was ordained into the gospel ministry at Bailey Baptist Church. At the present time, we have 196 resident members and 36 non-resident members. Twenty-three were added this year.

Many challenges still lie ahead for Bailey Baptist Church and we look forward to the future always with a prayer in our hearts for our continued success. Being confident of this thing, that what God has started, He will bring to completion for His glory.

History of Castalia Baptist Church

"Jesus Christ...the same yesterday and today and forever." Hebrews 13:8

Castalia Baptist Church was organized in 1891 by Rev. George Duke with the following charter members: Mr. and Mrs. S.J. Bartholomew, Mr. and Mrs. D.S. Rice, Mr. and Mrs. Merritt Batchelor, and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Coppedge.

The church was housed in three different buildings in the Castalia area from 1891 until 1961 when it was settled in the building that it presently occupies.

The first two buildings consisted of one large room each. The third contained a large auditorium with four Sunday School rooms. Mr. S.J. Bartholomew was a key contributor and leader in the construction of this third building. In October 1927 six more Sunday School rooms were added to the building with Louis May as the contractor and lumber donated by Dr. A.L. Denton.

In the fall of 1960 the members made plans to begin construction of a fourth building, the present church, which consists of a sanctuary and an educational building. Jack Cone was the contractor and W.J. Edwards was serving as pastor at the time. The dedication service for the new church was held on June 4, 1961, with B.A. Mitchell and Julian King, two former pastors, taking part in the program. On June 13, 1965, a note burning service was held to burn the note for the \$10,000 borrowed to complete the building. Rev. J.C. Carnes was serving as the church's pastor at the time. God had blessed us in a wonderful way, making it possible to build a new church; beautiful, adequate, and to have it all paid for in just a little over four years!

Several improvements and additions have been made over the years. These are as follows: (1) a new well was drilled on the church lot and the church building was insulated in 1970; (2) installation of a new heating system with central air conditioning and the painting of the sanctuary were completed in 1971; (3) also, in the same year a new Baptistry Scene was donated. In the fall of 1974 a new Allen Organ was added to the sanctuary. In the early '80s, chimes were donated to the church by Lizzie Drake and a new sound system was donated by an anonymous benefactor.

On August 12, 1983, the bell that originally hung in the previous church building's steeple was rightfully placed in the steeple of the current church. After 22 years of silence, this bell once again calls us to worship each Sunday morning. This was made possible through a donation by Mr. Tom Boulden in memory of his wife, Estelle.

The Tar River Association met with Castalia Church in 1926, 1941, 1966 and 1972. The church has had one man to answer the call into the ministry. Rev. Harvey Coppedge was ordained into the ministry on August 30, 1945.

On October 12, 1947, the church voted to build a parsonage on a lot given by Miss Eugenia Boone. The Rev. and Mrs. W.H. Hollowell were the first to occupy the new home, moving in on January 27, 1949.

In 1974 we dissolved our association with Pleasant Grove Church and called a full-time pastor, Rev. John E. Carkeet, the first full-time pastor since 1949.

God has blessed and used this church in the community for the past 98 years in a marvelous way. Since there is no record of the early church history, some of the older church members were able to recall the names of the pastors serving from 1891 until 1920 as:

History of Fishing Creek Baptist Church

Fishing Creek Baptist Church came into being and affiliated itself with the Tar River Baptist Association in 1881. Living in a northern section of Nash County were three Christian men who felt a need for a place in which to worship God, to study, and to fellowship. T.M. Ward, T.P. Alford, Miles Bobbitt and their wives became charter members of Fishing Creek Baptist Church. The first service, a revival, was held under a bush arbor. For a short while services were held in an old storehouse. Later much of this lumber was used to build the first church building. Brother G.W. Newell, the first pastor, presented the church with a beautiful Bible which the church still treasures along with the original Lord's Supper utensils which were given by the Bobbitt family.

The earliest known deacons were: Brothers T.T. Warren, A.R. Shearin, and J.A. Saunders. In 1944 Mrs. Eva Ricks and Mrs. Carrie Ward were ordained as the first deaconesses.

Over the 100 year period, Fishing Creek Church has had 28 pastors and has advanced from Saturday and Sunday services once a month to a church service every Sunday. One minister has gone out from our church, Rev. W.O. Rosser. Rev. H. Reid Miller, a Canadian, served the church 17 years.

From 1954 until the fall of 1976 all of our pastors were students of Southeastern Seminary. During this time we advanced to full-time.

In 1947 a brick structure was begun on the original site and was ready for use by the fall of 1949.

In 1968 a community building was erected next to the church and has been used for many church functions.

The first Chrismon tree was dedicated in 1977. During the fall of 1979 a new air conditioning and heating plant were installed. During that winter and much of 1980 the Sunday School department was remodeled by adding classroom space, a music room, and a pastor's office. A brick sign has also been erected at the entrance to the church grounds.

On June 28, 1981, Fishing Creek held a Centennial Celebration with four former pastors, many former members and visitors present.

A three bedroom, two bath parsonage was completed in early 1987, next to the community building.

God truly blessed us in late November of 1988. A tornado leveled the trees around the cemetery but did little structural damage to the church building and no damage to the parsonage or community building.

Through the sale of peanuts and a fish supper, we sent our pastor, Rev. James Horton, to Brazil in August of this year. He is a member of the Evangelism Team.

For the last two summers, we have held a migrant ministry on Sunday afternoons.

We are very proud to have one of our young ladies studying and witnessing in Indonesia for a year.

Today, the church has an active Brotherhood and a Woman's Missionary Union with one Baptist Women's group and two Youth Organizations. Also, we have Adult, Youth, and Tiny Chimes choirs meeting weekly.

It is our prayer and our belief that we will continue to grow as long as we keep alive our heritage—a compelling belief in and a need to worship God, to study His Word, and to fellowship with Him and with our fellowmen.

Sunday School Report

The Sunday School continues to be the largest program organization in the life of the Southern Baptist Convention and in the churches of the Tar River Baptist Association. It is not unusual for some churches to regularly have more people in Sunday School than in the morning worship service. It is important, therefore, that Sunday School work be strengthened as a reaching and teaching organization of the local church.

The Sunday School ASSISTeam is available to help any church that may need help with their Sunday School work. They are available throughout the year and are equipped to offer specialized church consultation. We urge our churches to avail themselves of the training opportunities that the Associational ASSISTeam can offer.

During the past year Associational Sunday School work has centered around three main events or emphases. The Associational Vacation Bible School Clinic was conducted on April 24 at the Flat Rock Baptist Church. There was good attendance and gratitude is expressed to those who led the conferences. Associational Sunday School Leadership Night was held on September 12 at the Bunn Baptist Church. Mrs. Linda Thompson, church materials representative coordinator of the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee, did a Curriculum Workshop. There was good participation from the churches. Everyone who attended found the workshop to be most helpful. The Associational Key Leadership Conference was conducted on September 19 at the Spring Hope Baptist Church. All of the conferences were well attended but Sunday School and WMU had extremely large groups. Rev. Aubrey Quakenbush, retired minister from Clinton, North Carolina, brought a very fine message of challenge.

Let's make this coming year our very best year yet in Sunday School work. Many exciting training opportunities will be offered through the Association and the Baptist State Convention for the support and strengthening of Sunday School work. We will also begin to prepare for a Sunday School Enlargement and Improvement Campaign to be conducted in 1991. Pastors, Sunday School directors, and Sunday School workers need to lead the people of the churches to participate and become more proficient in reaching people for Christ and in teaching them the Word of God.

I look forward to serving as Associational Sunday School director for 1989-90. Please feel free to call on me if I can help you in any way with your Sunday School work.

Executive Committee Report

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association has met five times since the last Annual Meeting, with one meeting being a special called session.

DECEMBER 12, 1988

Moderator for the session was Terry Alford. Thirty-six were present from 15 churches. Mrs. Nan Jones reported that several churches participated in the North Carolina Correctional Center Christmas project by providing 140 bottles of shampoo for their Christmas packages.

The Treasurer's Report was presented by Maylon Frazier. He reported that we are operating around \$4,000 in the red and our churches need to be encouraged to contribute consistently in order to keep our bills paid. Dr. Harry Kahn made a motion that our Steward-ship Committee send a letter to all our key leaders of Tar River informing them of our financial situation. Motion was seconded and carried.

Rev. Bill Wallace was recognized for his report (See his report in book for details.) He shared with the group that money is being received through the Associational office to help with disaster/tornado relief if churches would like to participate. Harris Chapel and Mount Moriah (Black church in Bunn) were damaged very heavily. North Carolina Baptist Men will be rebuilding Mount Moriah Church and need participation from our churches.

The Baptist Men and RA Rally to be held at Red Bud on January 21, 1989, was announced by Mr. Wayne Gupton. The meal will be served from the North Carolina Disaster Van.

Mr. Maylon Frazier expressed his appreciation to the Association for allowing him to serve as Treasurer for the past 21 years.

MARCH 20, 1989

Moderator for the session was Terry Alford. Twenty churches were represented with 48 in attendance. The WMU Report was presented by Mrs. Nan Jones encouraging good attendance at several events coming up, especially the WMU Annual Spring Meeting to be held at Rocky Cross Church, April 10, 1989.

Mr. Wayne Gupton expressed appreciation for support of the Baptist Men/RA Rally held in January.

Gary Anderson announced RA Basketball Banquet to be held March 24 at Flat Rock Church.

Mr. Richard Morgan, Stewardship chairman, reported that at the request of the Executive Committee, a letter had been mailed to all key leaders in Tar River concerning our financial situation and requesting that special offering be taken to help in this situation.

Mr. Sam Wood, treasurer, announced that our Association is out of the red and expressed his appreciation to all the churches for their support of the special offering.

The Associational Council made the following motions: (1) That Tar River participate in the "Here's Hope, Jesus Cares For You" simultaneous revivals, April 1-8, 1990. Motion seconded and carried. (2) A motion that Tar River Baptist Association implement Strategy Planning. Motion seconded and carried. (3) A motion that there be a called meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association on April 2, 1989, Duke Memorial Baptist Church to act on the sale of the Tar River Association office property located in Justice and that the trustees be allowed to negotiate the sale and price of such property with the action of the trustees to be approved by the Tar River Baptist Association Executive Committee. We further move that for the interim between the sale of the property and the completion of our new building that the trustees be authorized to negotiate for the use of rental property for use as an Associational office. After explanation, motion was seconded and carried.

Request for Sims Mission for pastoral aid from the Baptist State Convention was approved.

Rev. Bill Wallace announced that a special envelope was available for those who wish to support the volunteers going to Brazil. Announced the need for help with rebuilding Mount Moriah Church. Also, plans for our new buildings have been received from the Sunday School Board. The Building Committee will meet soon to go over these. Volunteers are still needed to go to Brazil.

APRIL 2, 1989

Moderator for the special called meeting was Terry Alford. Only official business for the purpose of the called meeting would be conducted at this meeting. Recommendation from the March 20, 1989, Executive Committee meeting was read to the group. (See minutes from March meeting above.) Motion was made to accept first part of recommendation as stated with the following amendment that all funds from the sale of the current property, plus interest be designated to Building Fund for the new building to be located in Louisburg. Motion seconded with amendment carrying with six voting against it. Original motion carried with 88 voting for and seven against the motion.

Second part of motion was read: Motion concerning rental property was seconded and carried with 81 voting for and five against the motion.

JUNE 19, 1989

Moderator for the session was Terry Alford. Forty were present from 19 churches. Mrs. Nan Jones reported that 280 people attended the WMU Annual Meeting at Rocky Cross in April. Rev. Jim Moyniham, Church Training director, reported that Tar River now has a Church Training Council to help the churches. Mr. Sam Wood presented the Treasurer's Report indicating that our funds continue to run low and encouraged consistent giving and at least four percent from our churches.

Rev. Bill Wallace was recognized for his report. Following are highlights from this report: Trustees have met and our property has been appraised; Your Building Committee has secured the services of architect Robert Proctor of Rocky Mount to help with the design and working drawings of our new office building; Strategy Planning has begun

and will report soon; The Mission Team will minister in Brazil August 3-16, 1989; Reported that two churches, Community Baptist, Franklinton, and Beulah Christian Church near Rolesville, have expressed interest in affiliating with Tar River Baptist Association. Both have been referred to our Credentials Committee.

SEPTEMBER 25, 1989

Moderator for the session was Terry Alford. Fifty-three were present from 22 churches. Mr. Wayne Gupton announced project of collecting socks for the street people of New York by our Baptist Men and RAs.

Rev. Jimmy Pulliam, Evangelism director, encouraged all churches to vote to participate in the Here's Hope revivals in April 1990.

Mr. Richard Morgan, Finance Committee chairman, presented the proposed budget for 1990 to be voted on at the annual meeting in October.

Rev. Clark Rounds presented the following motion from the Associational Council: "That Article III, paragraph C of the Constitution be changed to read as follows: The Association shall meet biannual in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session." (Note: This is a return to the reading in effect prior to the changing of one meeting a year ago.) Note: Unless the Constitution has been changed from what was printed in 1988, our recommendation can take effect in 1990-91 if we provide to all churches at least two weeks before the Annual Meeting. Motion was seconded and carried.

Rev. Bill Wallace was recognized for his report. Amount received for the special offering during Associational Emphasis week was \$1,465.42. The Strategy Planning Committee will present a printed report at our annual meeting in October with goals and action plans to be voted on by the Association. Our Annual Meeting will be held October 23 and 24 at Spring Hope and Castalia Churches.

Mr. Richard Morgan reported that our History Committee will meet again soon and seek to get our history to the printer. Meeting adjourned with prayer.


HOPKINS CHAPEL: Held a training session for Sunday School teachers and assistants.


LOUISBURG: The church observed its first Founder Day service on May 21. It was a time of remembrance of the church's past and a time of reflecting on dreams for the future.

Credentials Committee Report

In May of 1989 the Beulah Christian Church contacted our Director of Missions about the possibility of affiliating with the Tar River Baptist Association. The Beulah Church had no affiliation with the Christian denomination or any other denomination. At that time they were sensing a need for affiliation with a larger group. They had no camp to which to send their youth. They had no opportunity for training, study, or fellowship with a denominational body. They expressed to us a definite need for the support and other advantages that could be theirs by affiliation with an association of churches.

For several years, the Beulah Church has had a Southern Baptist pastor. He has been teaching and preaching Baptist doctrine. They recently wrote or revised their church constitution, and they followed a model constitution provided by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. The Beulah Church appointed or elected a committee to work with our Credentials Committee on the matter of affiliation. We have not only found the people warm, friendly, and of a kindred spirit, but we have also found their interest in becoming a part of the Tar River Baptist Association to be genuine.

Your Credentials Committee has examined the Constitution and Articles of Faith of the Beulah Church. We have found nothing "out of line" or "out of character" with Southern Baptist beliefs, or with Southern Baptist polity or policy.

In compliance with the request of the Beulah Church, we recommend that they be received under the watchcare of the Tar River Baptist Association for a period of one year, and after that into full fellowship with the Association.

Recommendation from the Credentials Committee

Last June our Director of Missions had a visit from Reverend Joe Pierce. Rev. Pierce told our Director of Missions that he was pastor of a newly formed congregation of Southern Baptists. He stated that the congregation was meeting near Franklinton, NC, and that they had already been constituted as a church. He further stated that they had no affiliation with an association and wanted to request membership in the Tar River Baptist Association.

Rev. Pierce was told that his church would need to make their request in writing, and that they would also need to submit copies of their constitution and their statement of faith for examination by your Credentials Committee.

The Community Baptist Church subsequently provided the necessary documentation. They also informed your Credentials Committee that they had already attained membership in both the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Your Credentials Committee met with leadership from the Community Baptist Church and discussed the matter of affiliation. Your Committee has found nothing in their articles of incorporation or their doctrinal statement that is inconsistent with Southern Baptist beliefs, polity or policy. We, therefore, recommend that the Community Baptist Church of Franklinton, NC, be received under the watchcare of the Tar River Baptist Association for the period of one year.

Discipleship Training Report

The Associational Discipleship Training program exists to assist churches in starting, improving and expanding Christian Discipleship through their Discipleship Training programs. More specifically, Associational Discipleship Training should: (1) Call churches to be on mission to reach persons for Discipleship Training; orient new members; equip all church members for Discipleship and Personal Ministry; teach doctrine; and train church leaders for ministry. (2) Provide resources and services to churches. (3) Train, develop and encourage church and Associational Discipleship Training leaders. (4) Provide opportunities for working together in ministry, missions, growth and Evangelism. (5) Establish and maintain appropriate relationships with the community and the denomination.

While these are the objectives of our Discipleship Training efforts in our Association, we do not currently have the organizational structure in place to provide these services. Our first effort has been in this past year, and continues to be in the upcoming year, to recruit and to develop this structure. The basic structure consists of an Associational Discipleship Training Team (ADTT). This includes the director, an Adult director, Youth, Children and Preschool directors. Currently, Mrs. Joann Wallace (Pilot) is serving as our Adult director and Mrs. Eleanor Denton (Sandy Creek) is serving as our Children's director. The other two positions remain vacant at the present time.

We are endeavoring this year to access our Associational Discipleship Training needs and then to plan our efforts to meet those needs. We will continue to seek to recruit the Youth and Preschool director positions while training our ADT Team in the development of our services to you as your Discipleship Training leadership. We see ourselves to be in a ''foundation'' building phase at the present time. What we need from the churches is your input as to your Discipleship Training needs and your suggestions as to the best ways to meet your needs. If you would like to join us in these efforts to serve our Association, please contact our Associational Office or contact me personally.

Evangelism Committee Report

It would be good to find churches praying for that power. The answer to the question is "yes." Every Christian and every church can and must be evangelistic.

Another question accompanies the third one: How long will it take to convince the leadership within the church that a church should be evangelistic? The pastor is at the top of the list. If he is motivated to reach people for Christ, it will rub off on the deacons and on other church members. It is a must that the leadership have a desire to reach people for Christ.

If there is a desire in the heart of a Christian to reach people for Christ, people will be reached. Souls will come to know Christ as their Saviour.

The time has come for us to offer the gift of hope to a dying world. All churches within the Tar River Baptist Association have a great opportunity to become stronger evangelistically. "HERE'S HOPE, JESUS CARES FOR YOU." APRIL 1-8, 1990, SIMULTANEOUS REVIVAL EMPHASIS is for you. A goal of at least 35 churches in the Tar River Baptist Association has been set. With GOD'S HELP and our commitment to Him, this goal will be met.

Woman's Missionary Union Report

The work of WMU in Tar River is conducted by approximately 1,450 members in 140 organizations of Mission Friends, Girls in Action, Acteens, Baptist Young Women and Baptist Women.

The purpose of all the age-level organizations is to study missions, engage in mission action and personal witnessing, and to support missions through prayer and giving.

Tar River WMU is governed by an Executive Committee of nine women, each state trained to represent all age levels of WMU as well as Mission Action and Enlistment Enlargement. These association leaders in turn train their counterparts in the local churches. Our fall workshop was held at Hickory Rock Baptist Church on September 11, 1989.

Many events took place in Tar River WMU this past year. Many churches took part in the North Carolina Correctional Center Christmas project by providing 140 shampoo bottles for their Christmas boxes. Another special event was the Food Lion project to raise money for our Baptist Children's Home. Baptist Young Women sponsored a Craft Day at Pilot Baptist Church on September 16. It was well attended and enjoyed. In keeping with our theme for 1989-90, "In His Name, Reach, Teach, Touch," a Lifestyle Witnessing Seminar was held at Pilot Baptist Church, October 14 with approximately 30-35 women in attendance.

Our Annual Spring Meeting was held at Rocky Cross Baptist Church with 232 attending. A very inspiring message by Nancy Curtis, State WMU Director, was the

highlight of the afternoon session along with Anita and David, a nationally acclaimed ventriloquist team. Anita and David share the gospel in a very unique way. A special invitation was extended to our MFs, GAs and Acteens to attend this meeting. Forty extra young people came in for our meeting. Danny and Nancy Callis, missionaries to Brazil, spoke to us during the evening session. Special music was presented by Steve and Cindy Kegley of the Franklinton Baptist Church. A special offering, in response to our volunteers that went to Brazil, was taken and we received \$317.36 for this cause. Special thanks are extended to the churches helping Rocky Cross host this meeting. Our Annual Spring Meeting is a highlight of the year for Tar River WMU.

Tar River WMU exists to assist the churches. Please call on your council anytime and give us the privilege of working with you to multiply mission work in our churches.

Baptist Retirement Homes Report for 1989

This marks the 38th year of ministry by the Baptist Retirement Homes to the Baptist Older Adults of this state.

Charged in 1951 with the mission of providing residential care for "Aged Saints," the Homes provide care for Older Adults in five locations across the state (Albemarle, Asheville, Hamilton, Winston-Salem and Yanceyville).

A new continuing care retirement community, Brookridge, located in Winston-Salem, will open for operation in the fall of 1989.

Recognizing the growing need for quality residential care for Older Adults, the Board of Trustees of the Retirement Homes has formulated a three-pronged long-range plan to meet this need:

- * To work with churches and associations in the development of regional continuingcare retirement communities in the west, the Piedmont, and the east.
- * To work with churches and associations in the development of "free-standing" residential housing (independent-living units, assisted-living units, and nursing-care units).
- * To work with churches and associations in the development of alternative forms of residential care for Older Adults (Respite Care, Adult Day Care and Home Health Care).

One of the greatest challenges North Carolina Baptists face as they move into the 21st century is the question of how residential-living situations for Baptist Older Adults are to be provided.

With the support of North Carolina Baptists, the Retirement Homes sees this challenge as a wonderful opportunity for ministry.

Director of Missions Report

It has been a joy to work with Tar River Baptists during the past year. I want to thank all of those who have given encouragement and support along the way. My gratitude also goes out to those who have held offices and served on committees. Without all these fine people, my job would be extremely difficult, if not completely impossible. The year 1988-89 has been both exciting and eventful. In this report I will only touch on a few of the highlights of the year.

In November of 1988 a tornado hit our area leaving devastation in its wake. One of our churches (Harris Chapel) and a black church (Mount Moriah) suffered severe loss. The Harris Chapel Church was almost totaled and the Mount Moriah Church was just wiped off the face of the earth. In the eastern part of Franklin County a family suffered the loss of a house that was under construction at the time of the tornado. Tar River Baptists helped in each of these situations. We have provided funds in each case and we have given building assistance and other help with the black church and the residence. In addition, Tar River Baptists provided funds and other things to tornado victims.

During August 3-16, 1989, your Director of Missions led a Missions Team to Bauru, Sao Paulo, Brazil. The team consisted of 11 members of the Tar River Baptist Association, two members of the Cullom Baptist Association and two members from the Flat River Baptist Association. This was a time of personal witnessing and revival. We had the opportunity to preach and/or give personal testimonies in churches, schools, homes, prisons, busy offices, radio stations and on the streets. We saw more than 300 accept Christ as Saviour. It was one of the busiest times some team members had ever been involved in, but it was thrilling and rewarding. Our partnership with Brazil will continue through 1991. We hope and pray that many other Tar River Baptists will have the opportunity to participate as a team member before the partnership ends. Requests have tentatively been made for a construction team and an evangelism team for March 1990, and a construction team and an evangelism team for September 1990. You will be hearing more about this in the days ahead.

In March 1989 the Association voted to do Strategy Planning. Since that time untold manhours have been invested in the strategy planning process by at least 30 individuals. As a result, a five-year plan has been drawn up and is being presented to the Association during this annual session. It is an ambitious plan, but it is not unrealistic. Its goals are challenging, but reachable. It is a plan that gives direction to the work of our Association. I commend the plan to you for adoption. Please understand that once we plan our work, we must then work our plan if we are to be effective.

It's an exciting time to be a Christian and to be a member of the Tar River Baptist Family. I really feel that we are on the verge of our greatest days, if we will just be obedient to God and follow His leadership.

Baptist Hospital Report for 1989

The past year at Baptist Hospital has been characterized by growth in facilities and personnel, advancement in medical technology and continuation of the spirit of personal concern which springs from the hospital's Christian heritage and its denominational tie.

Occupation of the new North Tower is almost complete, increasing the hospital's bed capacity to 806. Construction of the Clinical Sciences Building is expected to be completed by 1990. The Medical Center Boulevard is currently being moved to make ready for expansion of the Patient/Visitor Parking Deck. Two new helicopter pads, one for the AirCare helicopter and a second for helicopters from other medical centers, will be located on top of the parking deck. The J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging will be built on the approximate site of the current helicopter pad. These new facilities will make it possible not only for our hospital to serve more people but to serve them better.

In recent months the hospital's Level One Trauma Center has seen further development of its critical care transportation system by adding to the helicopter ambulance service its own neonatal ambulance for critically ill infants. The CommView Computer System, developed jointly by the Department of Radiology and A T & T, digitizes images, stores large volumes of data and transmits the images via fiberoptic cable throughout the Medical Center and via satellite to other hospitals without any x-ray film. Some brain tumors can now be successfully treated by implanting a tiny radioactive pellet directly into the tumor. Other types of cancer can be treated by hyperthermia which carefully focusses microwaves to raise temperatures inside a tumor to 102 degrees to 105 degrees Fahrenheit to kill or injure cancer cells. A technique called Mohs Micrographic Surgery allows the removal of skin cancer with minimal damage to normal skin.

These and other advances in patient care attract patients from across the country and around the world. Last year the 22,100 persons admitted to Baptist Hospital came from almost every county in North Carolina, from 35 states and from eight foreign countries.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues its ministries to: the patient in the hospital; the family and friends of patients; the medical staff who minister to the patient; the person requesting counseling in our centers in Winston-Salem, Fayetteville, Morganton, Charlotte, Rockingham, North Wilkesboro; the ministers who seek our courses in clinical instruction, equipping them for specialized and pastoral ministries.

Added to these are our "Pastors' Sabbath' and "Interim Church' programs, as we work closely with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention in addressing the needs of pastors and churches.

We renew our commitment to the faithful delivery of pastoral care, beginning in our Medical Center and reaching around the world.

Baptist Hospital continues to feel the effect of the health care personnel shortage, especially as it attempts to open new facilities. However, we do not have any beds closed due to shortages. The Code Blue Program in high schools of northwestern North Carolina and the appeal to Baptist youth through Acteens is also creating interest in health care careers.

During the past fiscal year Baptist Hospital received \$668,937.39 through the Cooperative Program and \$303,133.07 through the Homes and Hospital Offering, including church gifts directly to the hospital. The hospital staff and patients are grateful for the services made possible by these gifts.

Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc. Report

Like salmon, Baptist Children's Homes this year struggled upstream to get ahead of the problems that plague America's children and families.

While maintaining group care services in place since 1885, BCH also inaugurated two innovative services in Care House, the first home for teen-age mothers and their babies we know of anywhere, and the Philpott Parent Aide Program.

Care House, where five teen-age mothers will learn to parent their babies, was dedicated June 4 during services at Lenoir's Lower Creek Baptist Church. Also dedicated then was the Marguerite Noel Home for Girls, our second behavior change home.

Until Care House, a young girl who had a child often could not return home. If she wanted to bear her child and keep it, the child had to go to one foster care home and the young mother to another until she was of age.

The Noel Home, like Moody Home in Franklin, cares for girls whose difficult behavior prohibits them from living at home or in traditional group care settings.

On June 21 BCH dedicated the Philpott Parent Aide Program in Davidson County. Trained volunteers will establish relationships with homes labeled "at risk" for child abuse. The volunteer will be counselor and friend, critic and confidant to help families spot and correct areas that lead to child abuse or neglect.

With renewed emphasis on church communication, BCH named two men to act as director of church relations and planned giving. Charles Tanner and Bill Morrow will arrange BCH speakers for your church and help your members with estate planning.


BCH continues to implement "intentionalized services" according to the long-range plan it adopted in April 1988. Peer culture therapy is being utilized on children at Odum Home and Noel Home and is being phased in at Mills Home. This program makes the children more responsible, both for themselves and others in their cottage.

BCH continues to garner popular support with North Carolina Baptists who contributed \$1.52 million through the Cooperative Program last year. In the 1988-89 fiscal year, more than \$1 million has been received in bequests.

The Executive Committee of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina this year declined to adopt a report of a special study committee that would have drastically reduced BCH's share of the Cooperative Program. The committee recommended and the General Board supported a return of individual special offerings to Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes and Baptist Hospital. All three social services agencies support such a move, which would eliminate the Homes and Hospital Offering they share. The state convention will vote on that proposal in November.

BCH, which began as an orphanage in Thomasville in 1885, operates four group care campuses, eight emergency care homes, a home for unwed mothers, a teen mother/baby home, two behavior change homes for girls, therapeutic camping and a model child development center. It has work in 17 locations across the state, serving more than 1,000 children and families each year.

All campuses and facilities welcome involvement by local churches, RAs, GAs, WMUs and Sunday School departments. Baptist support is strong for children and families and we pray it will continue to strengthen as needs grow every day.





Constitution

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches, and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet bi-annually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session.

ARTICLE IV - RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator and the Director of Missions shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; to send messengers to the Association Sessions; to give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter; these are to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the fall meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

ARTICLE VII - STAFF

The staff of the Association shall be a Director of Missions and a Secretary. Other staff members may be added by vote of the Association in annual or called session, or by the Associational Executive Board if said positions can be justified and funded.

ARTICLE VII - DUTIES OF THE STAFF

A. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to lead the Association to fulfill its mission faithfully effectively, and lovingly. His role is three-dimensional: (1) mission strategist, (2) minister to the churches, pastors, and other church staff members, and (3) general leader of the Association. Within the limits of his time and ability, he is to respond to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Association.

B. It shall be the duty of the Associational Secretary to provide administrative support services to the Director of Missions and to the Tar River Baptist Association.

ARTICLE IX - OFFICERS

A. The officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Trustees.

ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to plan for and preside over the annual and called meetings of the Association-In-Session and the Associational Executive Board, and to encourage fellowship and mutual care among the churches. He shall open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. The Moderator shall appoint a Parliamentarian to serve at each Session of the Association and the Associational Executive Board Meetings. He shall also serve as ex officio chairman of the Associational Executive Board. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to assist in developing fellowship and mutual care among the churches and church leaders. He shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in the Moderator's absence, serve as vice-chairman of the Associational Executive Board, and serve as Chairman of the Associational Council.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the Association-In-Session and of the Associational Executive Board, and to make this information available on request. The Clerk shall use all diligence to have the record of tranactions printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible and to mail the church clerks reminders about, and forms for, the annual church letter. The Clerk shall also serve as ex officio Secretary of the Associational Executive Board.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to assist in receiving, accounting, and disbursing of all the Association's monies as authorized by the Association or the Associational Executive Board. By virtue of his office the Treasurer shall be an ex officio member of the Finance Committee.

E. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to act as the legal agents of the Association and shall hold title of all property of the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive title to real and personal property, and to sell and convey or mortgage same upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association. They are also responsible for keeping an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association, a copy of which is to be kept on file in the Associational Office. The Trustees are to be three in number, and they are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

ARTICLE XI - COMMITTEES

The Committees of the Association are administrative in nature. These administrative Committees are as follows: Nominating; Credentials; Finance; Resolutions; Time, Place, and Preacher; Program; Constitution; Christian Education; Strategy; Properties; History; and others deemed necessary or desirable. Each Committee shall be under the supervision of the Associational Executive Board. Committee members shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new Committee will take office. Members are allowed to serve more than one term in succession.

ARTICLE XII - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

A. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to nominate all associational officers, leaders, committeemen and council representatives with the execption of associational staff members. This committee is to be appointed by the Moderator of the Association, and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Association in determining when churches are of like faith and order, and when they can be properly accepted in the fellowship of the Association. It is also the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association as voting members of the Association[†].

C. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the association in securing, administering, and reporting its finances. This committee will plan and propose an annual budget to the Associational Executive Board and suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. This committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. They shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as an ex officio member of this committee.

D. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to assist the Association in studying resolutions for adoption by the Association or the Associational Executive Board. This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting, Officers of the Association, Host Churches, and other matters. E. The TIME, PLACE, and PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational Meeting.

F. The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association and the host pastors of the Annual Meetng. It shall be their duty to assit the Association in planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Association. They shall receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form for the sessions of the Association which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business.

G. The CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes. This Committee shall receive all proposed changes and/or amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Tar River Baptist Association, and upon study of said changes and/or amendments make recommendations to the Association concerning said changes and/or amendments.

H. The CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to keep before the churches of the Association all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

I. The STRATEGY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Association in determining strategic objectives and staying on course in achieving them.

J. The PROPERTIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Association in properties administration. This Committee shall develop and recommend policies and procedures for using associational facilities and equipment.

K. The HISTORY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Association's life and work.

ARTICLE XIII - INSTITUTIONAL AND AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES

The Institutional and Agency Representatives of the Convention shall include the following: Annuity Board, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes, Christian Higher Education, Religious Literature, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Missions. The representatives for these institutions and agencies shall be responsible for providing information to the churches during the year, and/or giving reports on the work of the institutions and agencies at the Annual Meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE XIV - MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

The Mission Performance Councils shall undergird and give support to the work of program related ministries of the Association. Training leadership shall be a primary responsibility of these Councils. All Mission Performance Councils shall be under the supervision of the Associational Executive Board. These Mission Performance Councils are as follows: Seminary Extension, Ordination Advisory, Music Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Vacation Bible School, Recreation, Media Library, Pastoral Ministries, Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions Development, Youth Ministry, and Family Ministry.

ARTICLE XV - DUTIES OF THE MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

A. The SEMINARY EXTENSION COUNCIL shall direct any Seminary Extension Program for the churches affilitated with the Association. This Council shall be composed of at least (5) members.

B. The ORDINATION ADVISORY COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to act only in an advisory capacity for churches seeking assistance in examining prospective candidates approved for ordination. This Council shall conduct its work within the guidelines of the Association.

C. The MUSIC COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. This Council shall plan and implement the music program of the Association. They shall recommend to the Program Committee the music for the Annual Meeting, and they shall enlist accompanists for all Associational Meetings.

D. The SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of the ASSISTeam to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate Associational Sunday School Work.

E. The DISCIPLESHIP TRAINING COUNCIL shall be composed of age level leaders (Preschool, Children, Youth, Adult) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the total Associational Discipleship Training Program.

F. The WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION COUNCIL shall consist of the leadership recommended by the WMU Nominating Committee and elected by the Associational WMU. This Council will have the responsibility of planning, promoting, conducting, and evaluating Associational WMU work.

G. The BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL shall be composed of the officers of the Associational Brotherhood. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, and evaluate the work of Associational Baptist Men and also the work of Associational Royal Ambassadors.

H. The VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. The Vacation Bible School Council Director is the leader of the VBS team and shall plan and promote the Associational VBS Clinic. The team of age-group VBS leaders who comprise this team shall be responsible for conducting the Associational VBS Clinic.

I. The RECREATION COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members whose duty it shall be to help plan, coordinate, promote, and conduct the entire recreation program of the Association. They shall be available to assist any Associational entity with the planning and conducting of recreational activities. The work of this Council includes setting up and supervising the Associational Basketball Program, and any other Associational Sports Programs that may be started. This Council will also plan, promote, and conduct the Annual Royal Ambassador Track Meet, and the Annual Royal Ambassador Car Competition.

J. The MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL shall consist of at least three (3) members. This Associational Church Media Library Organization is often referred to as TACMO. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to provide for the mutual sharing of inspiration and information for furthering the Church Media Center Ministry of the affiliated churches.

K. The PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL shall be composed of the following: (1) Associational Pastoral Ministries Director, (2) Church Administration Services Coordinator, (3) Deacon Ministry Coordinator, (4) Vocational Guidance Coor-

dinator, and (5) Church Weekday Education Coordinator, and any others that may be deemed necessary or advisable. The duties of this Council shall be to determine the pastoral ministries emphasis in the Associational Program and to schedule the events in cooperation with the total programing of the Association. The major task of the Council shall be the development and training of ministries through conferences, workshops, clinics, awareness meetings, retreats, and ministries support groups.

L. The EVANGELISM COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. It shall be the duty of this Council to plan and promote any evangelism programs, training projects, and rallies in the Association. It shall also be the responsibility of this Council to keep evangelism before the pastors and laypeople of the Association.

M. The STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for stewardship development and promotion within or among the churches of the Association. It will be the task of this Council to seek to lead the churches to set specific, attainable, measurable stewardship goals.

N. The MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall consist of at least seven (7) members. This Council shall be responsible for missions development in the total program of the Association. The Council shall not only be concerned with already established missions, mission work, and mission activities; it shall be concerned with beginning new mission work. It will be their responsibility to study the missionary needs of the Association and make recommendations concerning new work. They shall also recommend mission projects or activities with which the churches in the Association may cooperate. They shall strive to get each church in the Association to elect or appoint a Church Missions Development Council.

O. The YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall plan youth related ministries for the Association including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

P. The FAMILY MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for helping to plan, promote, and conduct any program emphasis related to family life. This Council should strive to include the needs of senior adults, single adults, marriage partners, parents, and children.

ARTICLE XVI - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

The Associational Council shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, the Directors of the various Program Councils of the Association, and three members at large. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to assist the Director of Missions in planning, coordinating, promoting, and executing the Associational Programs, making recommendations to the Associational Executive Board or to the Association in its Annual Fall Meeting. It shall also be the duty of this Council to plan the Annual Associational Calendar. This council shall meet quarterly on another Monday evening prior to each Associational Executive Board meeting, and at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator.

ARTICLE XVII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

A. The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of the Associational officers as set forth in Article IX, Director of Missions, along with key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Board members shall be members of the church they represent. If a church does not have all these leaders, it may appoint a representative for a committee prior to the regular Annual Fall Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Associational Executive Board shall meet quarterly <u>usually</u> during March, June, September, and December on Monday night following the fourth Sunday of the month unless a conflict necessitates moving the meeting to Monday after the third or fifth Sunday. The Associational Executive Board may meet at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator for the purpose of transacting special or urgent business.

C. Although each church should earnestly strive to get its full contingent of key leaders to attend, there is no quorum requirement for transacting business at a regular or called meeting of the Associational Executive Board.

D. The Director of Missions is an ex officio member of the Executive Board and does not have the power to vote.

E. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as follows:

1. The Executive Board of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary, and to define his duties.

2. To act for the Association between regular session of the body.

3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.

4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.

5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the annual budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.

6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Board in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

ARTICLE XVIII - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XIX - AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and the Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment(s) will be presented to the afternoon session and voted on no earlier than the evening session.

ARTICLE XX - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order*.

ARTICLE XXI - BUSINESS PROCEDURE

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with a prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator, and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. Any resolution to be presented to the Associational Executive Board and/or Annual Associational meetings must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Association and published in the Associational newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.


9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.

10. Reports of committees on Convention matters must be brief - that on missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to: Librarian of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina; *Biblical Recorder*, Raleigh, North Carolina; Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina; Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee and State Baptist Convention.

13. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

AFTERNOON SESSION

THEME: "Living Triumphantly in Troubled Times"

(Note from Clerk: Reports are not printed in the Proceedings. The reports are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

1. The 160th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Gerald Nelms, Moderator.

2. Rev. John Rausch led the opening hymn, "Praise Him! Praise Him!"

3. Rev. Jack Rose, pastor of Oak Grove Baptist Church, read scripture from Ephesians 6:10 and led in the opening prayer.

4. The moderator reminded the messengers that the meeting would be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order* and that only duly elected messengers or alternates would be eligible to vote. Mr. Epp Catlett was appointed to serve as parliamentarian.

5. Rev. Clark Rounds presented the report from the Program Committee. Motion was made, and Rev. Randall Speer seconded that the printed program be adopted. Motion carried.

6. The following new pastors were recognized and welcomed to the Associaton: George Fox, Pleasant Grove; Dannie Hayes, Bethlehem; Garland Hendricks, Castalia; Wayne Schlink, Union Chapel; Stan Dixon, Fishing Creek; Andy Cook, Cedar Rock; Bill Sheffield, Mount Zion; and Gary McNair, Flat Rock. Ed Foskey was recognized as Youth Director of Rock Spring.

7. The histories of the host churches were presented by Mr. Everett Mangum, Oak Grove Baptist Church, and Rev. Cecil Aldridge, Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church.

8. Rev. John Rausch led in singing "Standing On The Promises."

9. The following reports were presented as printed in the program: Sunday School, Discipleship Training, WMU, Brotherhood, Church Music, and Evangelism.

10. The Memorial Service was led by Dr. C. Ray Pruette.

11. Rev. John Rausch led in singing "Jesus is All the World to Me."

12. Miscellaneous Business: Mr. Gilford Bufkin was recognized from the Credentials Committee with the following recommendations: (See Credentials Report.)

(a) That the watchcare status be lifted, and Beulah Church be accepted in full fellowship of the Tar River Baptist Association with all rights, privileges and responsibilities pertaining to member churches of the Tar River Baptist Association. That the

Beulah Church be allowed to be represented by official messengers at the 1990 meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association, meeting on Monday and Tuesday, October 22 and 23, 1990 at the Oak Grove Baptist Church and the Harris Chapel Baptist Church respectively. Motion was made by Dr. C. Ray Pruette and seconded by Rev. Gary McNair, and carried unanimously.

(b) That the watchcare status be lifted, and Community Baptist Church be accepted in full fellowship of the Tar River Baptist Association with all rights, privileges, and responsibilities pertaining to member churches of the Tar River Baptist Association. That the Community Baptist Church be allowed to be represented by official messengers at the 1990 annual meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association, meeting on Monday and Tuesday, October 22 and 23, 1990, at the Oak Grove Baptist Church and the Harris Chapel Baptist Church respectively. Motion was made by Rev. Randall Speer and seconded by Mr. S.P. Scott, and carried unanimously.

Mr. Terry Alford was recognized from the Constitution Committee. Last year the Association voted to enter into a five-year, long-range Strategy Plan that had a certain organizational structure. The plan included additional committees and the creation of mission performance councils. The Constitution Committee was assigned the task of revising the Constitution so it would conform with the organizational structure. (Please refer to printed constitution with revisions in Article III - Membership; Article XVI - The Associational Council; Article XVII - The Associational Executive Board.) Mr. Terry Alford made a motion that the Constitution be amended as presented. Rev. Roger Hensley seconded. Moderator Gerald Nelms stated that the vote would take place during the evening session.

13. The following Committee Reports were presented as reported in the program during the evening session program: Historian's Report, Executive Board Report, Nominating Report, and the Time, Place, and Preacher Report. Moderator Gerald Nelms made a motion that the Time, Place, and Preacher Report of the next year's meetings be accepted. Rev. Jack Rose seconded. Motion carried. Rev. Clark Rounds asked for a motion that the Nominating Committee Report be accepted as printed, with authority given to the committee to fill the open positions with qualified people. Motion made by Mr. Dan Johnson and seconded by Mrs. Elaine Lewis. Unanimously carried.

14. The Installation of Officers was led by Mrs. Virginia Wheless.

16. The afternoon worship service was opened by Rev. John Rausch leading the group in singing "All The Way My Savior Leads Me."

17. Rev. Jimmy Creech read scripture and led in prayer.

18. Special Music was presented by Rev. John Rausch.

19. The annual sermon was delivered by Dr. Larry Williams, pastor of Louisburg Baptist Church.

20. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Rev. Cecil Aldridge.

EVENING SESSION

21. The evening session was opened with special music by Melissa Watkins and Julie Wesson of Pilot Baptist Church, and Emily Edwards and Ginger Lamm of the Ephesus Baptist Church (members of the Tar River Baptist Associational Youth Choir), and Mrs. Sahee Carr from Ephesus Baptist Church. David Carr of Ephesus Baptist Church led the group in singing "Lily Of The Valley." Rev. Cecil Aldridge read scripture and led in prayer.

22. The Treasurer's Report was presented by Mr. Sam Wood.

23. The Trustees' Report was presented by Rev. Bill Wallace in the absence of Mr. Gerald Strickland.

24. The 1991 budget was presented by Mr. Richard Morgan. Motion was made by Rev. Cecil Aldridge that we adopt the budget as printed. Seconded by Rev. Roger Hensley and carried.

25. Miscellaneous Business: Mr. Terry Alford was recognized from the Constitution Committee. Mr. Alford restated the motions previously discussed in the afternoon session. Vote was unanimous.

26. Offering.

27. The following Council Reports were given: Seminary Extension, Ordination, and Recreation.

28. David Carr led in the singing of "He Lives."

29. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Credentials Committee Chairman, reported that we have two hundred eight (208) people present, representing forty churches.

30. Rev. Bill Wallace was recognized for his report. (See printed report.) Reports on the following mission ministries were given: Lake Royale by Rev. Mike Harrell, Fritz Anderson, Eva Anderson, and Doug Anderson; Louisburg Manor by Rev. Roger Hensley; Bunn Prison by Nanette Warren; and Spanish Ministry by J.T. Mercado, Carlos Oliveros, Jessis Solorio, and Proto Camacho.

31. The meeting was recessed with prayer by Rev. Andy Cook.

1. Rev. William Pyle welcomed everyone.

2. Special music was presented by the Meredith College Ensemble.

3. The 160th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Moderator Gerald Nelms.

4. Mrs. Jean Raybon led in the opening hymn, "Have Faith in God."

5. Rev. Billy Tharrington, pastor of Beulah Baptist Church, read the scripture and led in prayer.

6. The history of Harris Chapel Baptist Church was given by Mrs. Emily Murphy.

7. The following Institutional and Agency Reports were given: Baptist Retirement Homes, Baptist Hospital, and Baptist Children's Homes.

8. Rev. Grover Blackburn, Campbell College Campus Minister, reported on Christian Education.

9. Mr. Gilford Bufkin was recognized for the Credentials Report. He reported that we had forty-two (42) of our churches represented; one hundred forty-six (146) messengers, twenty-one (21) alternates, thirty-three (33) pastors, thirteen (13) associational officers, and forty-three (43) visitors had registered for the meeting. Mrs. Vada Strickland of Pleasant Grove Baptist Church was recognized for her attendance at all sessions, except one, for the past twenty-five years. Mrs. Elizabeth Allen of Franklinton Baptist Church was recognized for the past twenty-nine years.

10. The Resolutions Committee Report was given by Rev. Don Dowless as follows: "Whereas Oak Grove Baptist Church, assisted by Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church, and Harris Chapel Baptist Church has hosted Tar River Baptist Association's Annual Meeting. Be it therefore resolved that we express our appreciation for their hospitality in the way in which we have been received and served for the evening meal and for their tireless efforts on our behalf. Whereas, our officers and committees have served faithfully and with distinction in the discharge of their respective ministries and duties. Be it therefore resolved that we commend them for the unselfish use of their time and talent in guiding our associational programs and in continuing to share the Gospel of Christ. Whereas our Director of Missions, Rev. Bill Wallace, has served and guided Tar River Baptists faithfully and with enthusiasm. Be it therefore resolved that we commend him for a job well done and express to him our continued support as co-laborers in the Gospel effort."

11. Motion was made to accept the Resolutions Report as printed, seconded and carried.

12. Rev. Don Phillips of the Pearce Baptist Church was recognized as new pastor in the association.

13. Miscellaneous Business: Rev. Bill Wallace presented the calendar for 1991 as printed and asked for a motion to be accepted as printed with the authority of the DOM and office staff to add items needed as the year goes on. Motion was made and seconded, and carried.

14. Offering.

15. Mrs. Jean Raybon led in singing "Send the Light."

16. Our speaker for the evening message was Robert Erwin, Missionary to Brazil.

17. The Beulah Baptist Choir presented special music.

18. The meeting was adjourned with closing prayer by Rev. William Pyle.

History of Oak Grove Baptist Church

Oak Grove Baptist Church was organized in 1875. It was the outgrowth of a Sunday School begun by J.J. Barrow in a little log house on the George Timberlake place by the side of the Youngsville Road. This Sunday School grew so fast the members decided they needed a church. One of the members gave an acre of land located across the road from the old parsonage. The people joined together and buildt the small church.

In 1877 the church sent the first letter to the association, and in 1878 gave \$1.00 to the Foreign Mission to help pay the salary of Dr. M.T. Yates. Dr. Yates was born in North Carolina. He pioneered in Foreign Missions and stirred the association to an added interest in support for Foreign Missions.

For eight years, the church did not send a letter to the association. But during those years, three women met weekly at the church and held prayer meeting. The women were Mrs. Jim Young, Mrs. Virginia Williams, and Mrs. Martha Edwards. The church has had no pastor and during these years, the church had no service. In 1887 the church was reorganized, and many of the activities restarted. The total membership was 53.

The Central Baptist Association met at the Forestville Baptist Church from July 27 until July 30, 1887. Oak Grove was received into the association. The following were delegates: W.T. Barrow, W.A. Edwards, J.J. Ranes, W.H. Shearon, and L.G. Jordan.

In 1990 there were 74 in Sunday School. The pastor's salary was \$50.00. The church sent \$1.00 to Foreign Missions, and \$1.00 to Home Missions. The church sent \$5.17 to the Baptist Orphanage, and sent \$10.00 for the needy.

In 1903 a WMS with 12 members and a Sunbeam Band with 40 members were organized. Miss Nara Williams was president of the WMS and J.E. Hall was leader of the Sunbeam Band. Both Mr. Hall and Miss Williams were dedicated to their church and community. The early years of the church brought an awareness of the importance of teaching the children about missions. Space was limited in the small church and it was hard for the organizations to keep going, and finally the WMS dwindled. In 1910 the WMS was reorganized with Mrs. J.C. Satterwhite as president. The Baptist Women was organized to carry out the missions programs of the church and to help every member of the church to realize their responsibility of helping to carry the Gospel of Jesus Christ into all the world.

In the spring of 1915, Richard and Helen Pearce gave the church two acres of land on which the present church stands. In the summer, work was started on the new church, and by the middle of October, it was weatherboarded and temporary seats were made of rough planks, and a revival was held. The church membership was 136. Four thousand, five hundred dollars was spent for the new church building.

In 1930 Charles B. Howard became pastor. The Saturday services were changed from 11:00 o'clock in the a.m. to 2:00 o'clock in the p.m.

After Charles B. Howard resigned in 1933, Gordon Poole served until May, 1934. Homer Baker was pastor from 1934 - 1940.

In 1952 while W.M. Dameron was pastor, the decision was made to build a parsonage. Mrs. F.M. Mitchell donated one and one-half acres of land.

During Dwight Watts's pastorate, the parsonage was completed, cement walks were laid, and the church became fulltime with morning and evening services. In 1952 Sunday School enrollment was 185, and church membership was 343.

W.H. Pope was pastor from 1957 through 1961. Memorial windows were put in the sanctuary.

A large fellowship room and several classrooms were added while Paul Couch was pastor. The interior of the church was renovated and the outside was bricked. The fellowship building was completed in the fall of 1974.

In September of 1975, Oak Grove celebrated it centennial with the theme "Past, Present, and Future." An old-fashioned supper on Wednesday night with quilting, churning, and a museum of old relics was enjoyed by all. Members dressed in "old-fashioned" styles for Homecoming. The following Sunday was a look into the future with our Youth in charge of the service. Church membership was 225, and Sunday School membership was 146.

On January 16, 1979 at 12:30 a.m., a fire destroyed the sanctuary and Sunday School rooms of our church. Eleven fire departments responded, but it was too far gone. Church family members stood by unable to do anything but watch the blaze that took the 100 plus, year old church. This was a great shock to the community and a great loss to the church family. Gone was the beautiful Baptistery painting in memory of Vickie Keith given by her parents, Edwin and Marlene Keith. Gone were the pews, organ, communion table, nursery, and steeple. The list could go on, but the large Bible in the lectern on the pulpit was not burned. It was scarred from the heat, but it did not burn -God's Word did not burn. It is on display in the vestibule of the new church.

The first Sunday after the church burned, January 21, 1979, we had 96 in Sunday School. The sermon by our pastor, Robert Wilson, was taken from Matthew 11:20-30.

The new era in our church started that day. We had a good service, and most of the congregation rededicated their lives, and many wept as we heard the sermon and looked out on the ruins of the once beautiful sanctuary.

The new church was completed and dedicated on July 20, 1980. On November 6, 1984, all the notes were burned and the debt was paid.

On September 12, 1984, Mr. William Poole, interim pastor, turned over the key to the church to Mr. Jack Rose, our new pastor. Mr. Rose led the devotional service on this Wednesday night, and on Sunday, September 16, 1984, he preached his first sermon as the pastor of Oak Grove.

Down through the years, Oak Grove has kept the motto, "For Ye serve the Risen Christ." The three women that met weekly in 1878, and prayed for eight years kept their faith and trusted their Lord. They laid a strong foundation, and now the challenges are here for us today.

In the past, during our sad and good times, God has been good to us. When our church was destroyed, He was with us. We now hgave a beautiful sanctuary, and we thank God for it. Yes, He has been good to us in the past. He is good to us today, and He has promised to be with us tomorrow. Yes, we serve a living Christ!

Brief History of Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church

Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church is located in the Royal Community on Route 1706, M.C. Wilder Road in Harris Township. Eight miles south of Louisburg, N.C.

The church was founded upon the conviction that Mr. William Caswell Ransdell had received a vision from God to preach and to build a church. In 1912 Mr. Ransdell organized a meeting for Sunday School and a worship service which met under a brush arbor that Mr. Ransdell constructed. The Rev. Walter M. Gilmore of Louisburg was invited to help with the first meeting. There was about 100 people at the first service. Those present were not affiliated with another church; therefore, Mr. Ransdell and Rev. Gilmore continued to hold services under the arbor the remainder of the summer.

In the spring of 1913, under the leadership of Mr. Ransdell, a frame church was constructed. Mr. Ransdell who owned a saw mill donated and cut the lumber to erect the church. Mr. Issac Frazier suggested that the church be named "Ransdell Chapel" in honor of Mr. Ransdell.

Some of the Charter Members were, "Mrs. Martha H. Horton, Mr. and Mrs. Issac Frazier, Mrs. Mollie C. Young, Mr. W.T. Jones, Mr. Bailey F. Pearce, Mr. J.R. Clifton, Mr. William C. Ransdell, and Mrs. Etta Ransdell Ledwick.

In the church's 78 year history, 30 pastors have served the church. Rev. Walter Gilmore, D.T. Bunn, J.C. McGregor, Stanley McGregor, L.M. Denton, Rev. Classon, Lucas R. Evans, J.B. Usary, A. Lamonds, J. Winston Pearce, W.C. Bowden, P.P. Hartsell, Charles Crawford, Ira Nelson, Edward Wyche Green (served 20 years), Robert J. Wilderson, John M. Wood, Larry Jenkins, Copeland Whitmire, Claude Wells, Thomas Metts, Jr., John Hinkle, George M. Rowe, George D. Darnell, Ronnie P. Wildes, Jerry K. Sosebee, Garry Edwards, William Salmons, Earl Pennell, and the present pastor, Rev. J. Cecil Aldridge, Sr.

The first Deacons to serve the church were: John R. Clifton, Preston T. Clifton, and Thomas T. Young. The first Trustees were: W.T. Jones, J.B. Horton and William C. Ransdell.

Ransdell Chapel was received in the Tar River Baptist Association in 1920 with a membership of 17.

In 1943, the first building was torn down and a new one was constructed. This sanctuary and the two Sunday School rooms are still part of the present structure being used. The Building Committee was the following men: Rev. Greene, James Luther Denton, John W. Horton, Thomas T. Young, Dock Cash, and Charlie Dickens.

In 1947, Mr. and Mrs. William T. Horton donated and deeded an acre of land to be used for a cemetery.

In 1960, full time worship services were implemented. Under the leadership of Rev. John M. Wood, the church interior was completely renovated.

In 1970, the following additions were added to the church. Four Sunday School rooms, two bathrooms, a Baptistry, a well was dug, and a Fellowship Hall.

In 1976, Mrs. Sandy Darnell, wife of Rev. George Darnell, was licensed to the Gospel Ministry. She was the first woman to be licensed by the church.

In 1979, Mrs. Etta Ransdell Ledwick, left her estate to the church. Her will stated that the funds were to be used to build a parsonage. The parsonage was completed in May of 1980. On July 27, 1980, Dr. W.R. McCollum led the Dedication Service. Mrs. Ledwick was the last charter member.

Rev. James Horton answered the call to preach the Gospel. He was licensed and ordained by the church. Rev. Horton is now Pastor of Sharon Baptist Church, Flat River Association.

In 1981, the church installed a steeple on the sanctuary.

In 1982, the deacon rotation system was adopted.

In 1983, the church building was bricked. Central heat and air-conditioning was installed. Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Rice donated the church an organ. Mr. Rob Small was called as the first minister of Music.

In 1989, a new well was dug. The picnic shelter was erected.

In 1990, a new central heating and air-conditioning system was installed in the parsonage.

Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church continues to be in the service and will of God. It is striving in the community to take the Good News of Jesus Christ our Lord to each person. Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church fields are white to harvest. Pray that the labors will be many and the fruits gathered will be in abundance.

History of Harris Chapel Baptist Church

Eight miles east of Wake Forest, N.C., located between Highway 401 and 98, is Harris Chapel Baptist Church. The beginning of this church dates back to either 1884 or 1885 when a small Sunday School was organized in the Old Math Rock School Building on Highway 98 not far through the woods behind where the church stands at present. The Math Rock group met for several years as a Sunday School. In 1888 the school secured the service of Rev. Marion R. Pernell to lead them in a bush-arbor revival. Following the revival under Rev. Pernell's vigorous leadership, the Sunday School was constituted into a church. Mr. A.J.P. Harris donated the land upon which the first church building was constructed not too far from Math Rock School. The new church became known as the Harris Chapel Baptist Church. Records indicate that most of the charter members came from Flat Rock Baptist Church. Rev. Pernell was called to be the first pastor and led the church until 1890. The total offering for the year was \$22.58.

In 1902 the church had 82 members and called Rev. A.A. Pippin as pastor. He baptized 66 persons during his tenure. Under his leadership the membership increased to 104 and total annual contributions to \$129.88. In the following decade the Reverends Harrill, Gilmore, Mills, Plybon, Dowell and Davis served as pastors. Thirty-five were baptized, raising the membership to 135.

In 1921 Rev. Charles B. Howard began his ministry at Harris Chapel and served as pastor for the next 30 years. The church grew in many ways. The building was enlarged and the membership increased to 454. Contributions reached in excess of \$10,000. Rev. Howard baptized 317 into the church's membership. The church sponsored Mrs. P.W. Hamlett as Southern Baptist Missionary to China and contributed \$1,000 annually to her support. During these three decades Training Union was organized and reached an enrollment of 192.

In 1951 under the leadership of Rev. Howard's successor, Rev. Jack Wilder, the church built its first pastorium and for the first time had its pastor living in the community. The church continued to grow. A fellowship building was completed for church and community activities. Also, a choir loft and baptistry were added to the church building. Rev. Wilder baptized 30 and led the church to a record annual mission offering in excess of \$2,000. Following Rev. Wilder's pastorate, Rev. John Woody became pastor in 1953. During his work as pastor, the church grew and had record enrollments in Sunday School and Training Union.

During the years 1956-1962 Reverends Grover Everette, Leonard Miller and Hubert Hunting served as pastors. Rev. John Darnell served from 1962-1968, and Rev. Hoyt Lock served from 1968-1972.

At least six members of Harris Chapel have been ordained into the gospel ministry. They are: Dr. J. Winston Pearce, Rev. C.W. Driver, Jr., Rev. Bervin Ferguson, Rev. Robert Patterson, Rev. Jim Denton and Rev. William Monroe.

The church began raising money for a new sanctuary and educational building. The new church building was begun in July of 1968, and the first service was held on April 13, 1969. The Dedication Service was held on October 26, 1969.

On November 28, 1988, Harris Chapel was almost completely destroyed by a tornado at approximately 1:30 a.m. On April 2-5, 1989, the church held its first tent revival with a former pastor, Rev. Jack Wilder, preaching.

In 1989 a new church was built and the dedication was held on December 17, 1989.

Sunday School Report

The Sunday School continues to be the largest program organization in the life of the Southern Baptist Convention and in the churches of the Tar River Baptist Association. It is not unusual for some churches to regularly have more people in Sunday School than in the morning worship service. It is important, therefore, that Sunday School work be strengthened as a reaching and teaching organization of the local church.

The Sunday School ASSISTeam is continuously available to any church that wants to capitalize on their expertise. The team attended an indepth training seminar in March at Camp Caraway to prepare them to help you. On April 21, the team went to Beulah Baptist Church and assisted them with their various classes. The training was well attended and well received with good results.

Beginning in October of this year, the Sunday School emphasis is BREAK-THROUGH - REACH TO WIN, beginning a five-year plan for Sunday School. The ASSISTeam is standing by to assist you with this very important strategy.

The Associational Sunday School still centers on three main areas: Vacation Bible School, Sunday School Leadership Night, and Key Leadership Training. These conferences still continue to be well received and attended, being a time for sharing and worship.

The Associational Sunday School is here to help the churches of the Tar River Association better equip themselves to serve the people of their areas. Continue to pray and work.

Executive Committee Report

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association has met four times since the last Annual Meeting.

DECEMBER 18, 1989

Moderator for the session was Gerald Nelms. Fifty-seven were present from 20 churches. Rev. Bill Wallace announced that the Tar River Association would assist the Santee Association, South Carolina, with the Hurricane Hugo victims. He also announced the Baptist Men's Convention to be held in Raleigh on January 20 and 21, 1990, and the Associational Missions Night to be held at the Red Bud Church on January 27, 1990.

Miss Nanette Warren announced plans for a Youth Musical. Mr. Sam Wood presented the Treasurer's Report.

Rev. Bill Wallace was recognized for his report. He announced that we have until October, 1994, in which to develop the property on Highway 56, East. A Task Force Committee has been appointed to present a plan for the financing of the new building. The Constitution Committee has been contacted about bringing our constitution up to date.

MARCH 26, 1990

Moderator for the session was Gerald Nelms. Sixty-two were present from 26 churches. Rev. Bill Wallace announced the WMU Spring Meeting planned for April 9, 1990, at the Sandy Creek Baptist Church.

Rev. Bobby Trott reported that the ASSISTeam participated in training at Camp Caraway on February 2 and 3, 1990.

Mr. Richard Morgan, Stewardship Chairman, reported that our checking account is running very low.

Miss Nanette Warren announced dates for Youth Musical practice, and encouraged churches to participate.

Rev. Clark Rounds gave the Associational Council Report. He reminded us that we voted to return to two meetings per year, beginning in the spring of 1991.

Rev. Bill Wallace was recognized for his report. The Constitution Committee has finished the task of bringing the constitution in line with the Organizational Structure adopted in the Strategy Plan. The Sims Baptist Church was constituted on February 4, 1990. Mr. Wallace has led two mission groups to South Carolina to help the Hurricane Hugo victims. Stronger financial support from the churches is a necessity.

Rev. Tom Eldridge brought to our attention that the Constitution does not state that the pastor is a member of the Executive Board. Rev. Bill Wallace encouraged everyone to study the constitution, and all would have an opportunity to address it at a later date.

JUNE 25, 1990

Moderator for the session was Gerald Nelms. Thirty-one were present from 17 churches. Rev. Jim Moynihan announced that he is organizing an Associational Discipleship Training Program and needs additional leaders.

Mr. Richard Morgan, Stewardship Chairman, announced that the Finance Committee would meet on July 26, 1990 and discuss the possibility of adding five hours per week for our secretary, and an increase in salary for our Director of Missions for the coming year. Mr. Morgan informed us of the purchase of three James Dobson's videos and encouraged the churches to utilize them.

Rev. Clark Rounds announced that the Youth Musical had been rescheduled for August 12.

Mr. Sam Wood presented the Treasurer's Report.

Moderator Gerald Nelms stated that the Constitution would be voted on at the Fall Meeting. He also stated that under Article XVII (17), Line 4, the first person should read, "Pastor."

The Director of Mission's Report was read by Mr. Gerald Nelms in the absence of Rev. Bill Wallace who was attending a DOM Meeting at Wingate College. Following are highlights from this report: Christmas Toy Store is scheduled for mid-December, 1990; Medical-Dental Van will be available to migrant workers on July 14, and August 11, 1990; Spanish Fiesta is scheduled for August 26, 1990; and our first-ever Evangelism Conference will be held August 17-18, 1990.

Mr. Richard Morgan, Stewardship Chairman, announced that an auditor had been contacted, and the minimum fee for an audit of our records would be \$500. He stressed the fact that the Stewardship Committee meets every month and sees the handling of receipts, deposits, and disbursements. Rev. Randall Speer asked if it would be in order to make a motion to withdraw the request for an audit that had been made by the Executive Board. Rev. Clark Rounds stated that there were not enough people present nor enough churches represented. Rev. Speer put his request on hold.

Mr. Gerald Nelms reported on the Spanish Ministry. He announced that services are being held at Fishing Creek Baptist Church each Sunday morning from 9:00 to 12:00, and at Sandy Creek Baptist Church each Sunday afternoon from 3:00 to 6:00. Made a request for more health kits, clothing, and food.

SEPTEMBER 24, 1990

Rev. Bill Wallace served as Moderator for the session in the absence of Mr. Gerald Nelms. Sixty-six were present from 22 churches. Mrs. Nan Jones reported that the Fall WMU Workshop was held at Samaria Baptist Church, and the Spring meeting will be held in April.

Rev. Bill Wallace announced that the Royal Ambassadors Banquet will be held in the fall.

Rev. Jimmy Pulliam, Evangelism Director, announced that 22 churches participated in the "Here's Hope" Revival, and a first-ever Evangelism Conference was held.

Mr. Richard Morgan, Stewardship Chairman, presented the Treasurer's Report, and stated that the Finance Committee is working together with the DOM and Secretary to hold expenses to a minimum.

Miss Nanette Warren stated that the Youth Musical was a great success. The Hispanic Choir performed at the Key Leadership Conference.

Rev. Bill Wallace made available copies of the constitution which included changes requested by the churches. He announced that the revised constitution will be voted on at the annual meeting. Rev. Randall Speer made a request to suspend the Audit of our records for one year until funds become available. There were not enough churches represented to take a vote. Rev. Speer withdrew his request until the December Board meeting. Rev. Gary McNair made a motion that the Constitution Committee look into the possibility of amending the Constitution in such a manner as to allow those who attend the Associational Executive Board Meetings to transact business. Rev. Randall Speer seconded the motion. Motion was passed. No opposition. Rev. Bill Wallace will instruct the Constitution Committee.

Mr. Richard Morgan presented the Proposed 1991 Budget which will be voted on at the Annual Meeting.

Rev. Bill Wallace was recognized for his report. He gave the progress of the Hispanic Ministry. The Baptist State Convention is supplying a mobile unit for use with a new mission group in the Bailey area.

Rev. David Higganbotham announced that the Bunn Prison Unit worship servies are being reconstructed, and that the unit needs a piano.




Brotherhood Report

Director of Missions Report

This has been a good year in the Tar River Baptist Association. I'm not implying that there is no room for improvement. There is plenty of room for that, but God has blessed our joint efforts. We are seeing fruit for our labor and God continually opens new doors of mission opportunities. It is not only a privilege to serve as Director of Missions, it is also exciting.

Some of the highlights of the year include: (1) Several trips to South Carolina to help with clean-up and repairs for victims of Hurricane Hugo, (2) 22 of our churches participating in the "Here's Hope" simultaneous revivals, (3) Sims Mission constituting as Sims Baptist Church, (4) the Associational Youth Choir's presentation of the musical *Surrender*, (5) the addition of Brother J.T. Mercado, our summer migrant minister, (6) the continuation of our Hispanic work with Brother Mercado as our Hispanic pastor and Brother Carlos Oliverous as a catalytic missionary church starter, (7) our first Tar River Baptist Associational Evangelism Conference, (8) a very successful banquet for pastors, deacons, and spouses of pastors and deacons, and (9) the up-dating of our Constitution and Bylaws to bring it in line with the recently adopted organizational chart.

Mission ministries continue at the following places: (1) Bunn Prison (Bible Study one night each week, and a service each Sunday), (2) Lake Royale (an early Sunday morning service throughout the year), (3) Louisburg Manor (an 11:00 a.m. service each Friday). We have also been requested to bring at least three groups to Brazil during 1991 for the purposes of evangelism and construction.

I'm excited about two new ministries that are about to start. One of these is a new Hispanic Bible Study Group to be located in Nash County near Stanhope. The Baptist State Convention has promised the use of a mobile chapel that will be moved to property owned by Mr. Carson Barnes. Mr. Barnes has granted the use of his property at no cost to the association. We are hoping to get this work started by or before the first Sunday in December 1990. The second ministry to which I refer is our Christmas Toy Store. We hope to locate it somewhere in Louisburg where there will be both good visibility and good accessibility. Please pray for the success of these ministries.

For the most part we are on target with the Strategy Plan adopted last year at our annual meeting. Things that have not yet been completed are in the works and should soon be completed. That plan will be our major directional guideline over the next four years.

Work moves slowly but surely toward the planning of a new Associational Center. The Building Planning Committee has a proposed plan, but they are waiting on a special Task Force on Funding to bring a recommendation concerning a way to pay for the building without jeopardizing regular budget funds which are needed for programs and mission ministries. It is my hope and prayer that the proposed plan and a method of financing will be recommended soon by your Building Planning Committee and the special Task Force on Funding.

Baptist Hospital Report to Associations - 1990

"The largest health-science building program ever in North Carolina has changed the landscape on Hawthorne Hill, and the changes continue in rapid succession...One thing that hasn't changed is the institution's tradition for delivery of compassionate health care. That will never change." This statement, from Dr. Charles P. Nicholson, Jr., Baptist Hospital Trustee and Chairman of the Medical Center Board of Directors, is both a report and a commitment.

Another building in this \$190 million expansion program has recently been completed and occupied. The Clincial Sciences Building will house most of the Medical Center's ambulatory services, and has been termed a "medical supermarket," where patients may do "one-stop shopping." The building will also accommodate an Ambulatory Surgery Unit, Medical Center Administrative Offices, and other functions. Nearing completion, is the Day Care Center for children of medical center employees. Under construction, is an addition to the MRI (Magnetic Resonance Imaging) Building, and a significant addition to the Patient/Visitor Parking Deck. Construction on the Center on Aging Building is scheduled to begin in early 1991 with the completion date set for the spring of 1993.

The purpose of all these new facilities, according to hospital president, Len B. Preslar, Jr., is to "enable us to respond to patient needs better than ever before." In addition to continuation and improvement of many established procedures, several new diagnostic and treatment programs have been started recently. The Organ Transplant Program added a new dimension when it performed the first single-lung transplant in North Carolina. Bone marrow transplants are also being performed now in our Baptist Hospital. A Cranio-facial Clinic, to correct major deformities of the skull and upper face during the first year of life, opened recently. New laser technology provides an improved method for clearing out atherosclerotic deposits in the carotid arteries of the neck. New surgical techniques make possible better treatment of complicated retinal detachment. Orthopedic Surgeons began use of the Ilizarov Technique for the repair and lengthening of broken bones. New approaches are being used effectively in the treatment of children with Cerebral Palsy. Bowman Gray/Baptist Hospital is the only medical center in the nation using and evaluating Clinodean, a non-narcotic pain killer which has proven effective in controlling pain following surgery and for cancer patients.

Through these various services we provided 210,456 days of care for 22,607 patient admissions last year. In addition to these, there were approximately 388,000 ambulatory patient visits in the various clinics, the Emergency Department, the Day Hospital and in Ambulatory Surgery. These patients came from all across North Carolina and from 34 other states. Also the number of patients being referred to us from foreign countries is increasing as the reputation of the Medical Center spreads throughout the world.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to strengthen its reputation both as a service agency and as a teaching facility. Last year, the department provided more than 29,000 ministries to hospital patients, almost 19,000 services to families and more than 14,000 services for hospital and church staff members and their families. The Minister's Care Plan, a joint program with the Baptist State Convention, had 1,446 sessions with more than 200 different clergy families last year. The new Missionary Counseling and Support Services Program saw 48 individuals in its first six months. The Division of Clinical Pastoral Education/Chaplaincy had 53 students enrolled.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1990, the hospital received \$692,946.24 through the Cooperative Program and \$271,361.24 through the Homes and Hospital Offering and direct gifts. Cooperative Program Funds are used for the Department of Pastoral Care, and other church gifts help to provide Benevolent Care for financially needy patients. The hospital staff and patients are most grateful for this continuing financial support.

Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. Report

1990: Providing the Best of Times to N.C. Older Adults

Making life for Older Adults the Best of Times is the continuing goal of Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina Inc., which operates four residential facilities for Older Adults areound the state - in Albermarle, Asheville, Hamilton and Winston-Salem.

In Hamilton, Baptist Retirement Homes has provided assisted living in a residential setting for Older Adults since 1962. Getting the word out about the quality of care provided by the home is the purpose of a committee that has been formed to help promote the Hamilton Baptist Home around the region. Its ministry is greatly enhanced by the strong support of the surrounding community and its churches. The Brotherhood, WMU and senior adult clubs at many nearby churches provide fellowship, entertainment, skills and physical labor, household needs - whatever they see are needed by the home.

The other homes around the state have equally promising years ahead.

The Board of Trustees of Baptist Retirement Homes applied in July for permission to construct the 60 nursing care beds the state is allocating to Buncombe County in 1990.

State approval of its plans will be the next step toward adding a 60-bed health-care unit to the Western North Carolina Baptist Home. Currently the only nursing care provided by Baptist Retirement Homes is the 85-bed nursing-care unit at Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem, the newest facility operated by Baptist Retirement Homes. In Winston-Salem, Brookridge celebrates its first birthday in 1990. It is the largest of the facilities, providing five levels of care - independent living in garden homes, independent living in apartments, and assisted living, intermediate nursing care and skilled nursing care in its health-care unit - to 350 Older Adults.

The Albemarle Baptist Home also provides assisted living to 30 Older Adults. It also offers respite care for those families who are responsible for an Older Adult and need some time away from that responsibility. It, and other alternative forms of residential care for Older Adults, are additional ways being explored by the Homes to meet the growing needs of the Older Adult Baptist population in this state.

1990 Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc. Report

For 105 years Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina has been giving children a chance at life. This year we formalized that phase into our first state-wide fund-raising campaign.

The "Give a child a chance!" Campaign seeks to raise \$11 million over three years to expand Cameron Boys Camp, boost general operating income and increase endowment.

We will also be able to begin a before and after school care program in Davidson County, to give security to children of working couples, who won't have to go home to empty houses anymore.

Some of the endowment earnings will increase training to help staff deal with ever changing needs among the 1,000 children and families they serve each year.

Baptist men of North Carolina have agreed to build the new Tommy and Jeanie Eller Chuckwagon at Cameron, saving approximately \$75,000 in construction costs. Children's hopes were also bolstered by the return of the Thanksgiving Offering voted by messengers to the 1989 state convention. While suffering through its 12 year absence, BCH lost more than \$1 million in revenue.

In a change from a Homes and Hospital Offering to the Thanksgiving Offering, BCH will go 18 months without a special collection, a period that encompasses more than an entire fiscal year. For the past five years that special collection has meant \$400,000 to the ministry, a sum that will be difficult to make up in the 1990-91 budget. Some churches aware of the difficulty, have promised to begin receiving the Thanksgiving Offering in 1990.

The Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning from the churches. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our North Carolina churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. That is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

In August, BCH signed an agreement with Gaston County Department of Social Services to operate two emergency care homes owned by the county. Taht raises to 11 the number of emergency care homes BCH operates. That service, in which a child at risk of abuse or neglect can receive shelter right away, is the service most in demand throughout the state. Children stay a maximum of 60 days while BCH works with the custodian to determine a long-term plan of care.

In 1991 BCH will celebrate the 20th anniversary of the founding of Broyhill Home, our westernmost campus, in Waynesville/Clyde. With the help of J.E. Broyhill and his family, the home was opened in 1971 on 91 hilly acres. It has capacity for 48 children in group care and for eight girls in emergency care.

Baptist Children's Homes has a 105 year history. But its history is just the knot that ties it to a boundless, unbroken ribbon of promise that stretches beyond the future to wrap children and families with eternal blessings.
