# Constitution

## ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

## ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

## ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches, and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet bi-annually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session.

## ARTICLE IV - RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator and the Director of Missions shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

## ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; to send messengers to the Association Sessions; to give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter; these are to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the fall meeting of the Association.

## ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

#### ARTICLE VII - STAFF

The staff of the Association shall be a Director of Missions and a Secretary. Other staff members may be added by vote of the Association in annual or called session, or by the Associational Executive Board if said positions can be justified and funded.

#### ARTICLE VII - DUTIES OF THE STAFF

A. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to lead the Association to fulfill its mission faithfully effectively, and lovingly. His role is three-dimensional: (1) mission strategist, (2) minister to the churches, pastors, and other church staff members, and (3) general leader of the Association. Within the limits of his time and ability, he is to respond to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Association.

B. It shall be the duty of the Associational Secretary to provide administrative support services to the Director of Missions and to the Tar River Baptist Association.

#### ARTICLE IX - OFFICERS

A. The officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Trustees.

#### ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to plan for and preside over the annual and called meetings of the Association-In-Session and the Associational Executive Board, and to encourage fellowship and mutual care among the churches. He shall open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. The Moderator shall appoint a Parliamentarian to serve at each Session of the Association and the Associational Executive Board Meetings. He shall also serve as ex officio chairman of the Associational Executive Board. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to assist in developing fellowship and mutual care among the churches and church leaders. He shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in the Moderator's absence, serve as vice-chairman of the Associational Executive Board, and serve as Chairman of the Associational Council.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the Association-In-Session and of the Associational Executive Board, and to make this information available on request. The Clerk shall use all diligence to have the record of transactions printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible and to mail the church clerks reminders about, and forms for, the annual church letter. The Clerk shall also serve as ex officio Secretary of the Associational Executive Board.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to assist in receiving, accounting, and disbursing of all the Association's monies as authorized by the Association or the Associational

Executive Board. By virtue of his office the Treasurer shall be an ex officio member of the Finance Committee.

E. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to act as the legal agents of the Association and shall hold title of all property of the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive title to real and personal property, and to sell and convey or mortgage same upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association. They are also responsible for keeping an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association, a copy of which is to be kept on file in the Associational Office. The Trustees are to be three in number, and they are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

## ARTICLE XI - COMMITTEES

The Committees of the Association are administrative in nature. These administrative Committees are as follows: Nominating; Credentials; Finance; Resolutions; Time, Place, and Preacher; Program; Constitution; Christian Education; Strategy; Properties; History; and others deemed necessary or desirable. Each Committee shall be under the supervision of the Associational Executive Board. Committee members shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new Committee will take office. Members are allowed to serve more than one term in succession.

## ARTICLE XII - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

A. The **NOMINATING COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to nominate all associational officers, leaders, committeemen and council representatives with the exception of associational staff members. This committee is to be appointed by the Moderator of the Association, and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. The **CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Association in determining when churches are of like faith and order, and when they can be properly accepted in the fellowship of the Association. It is also the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association as voting members of the Association.

C. The **FINANCE COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the association in securing, administering, and reporting its finances. This committee will plan and propose an annual budget to the Associational Executive Board and suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. This committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. They shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as an ex officio member of this committee.

D. The **RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to assist the Association in studying resolutions for adoption by the Association or the Associational Executive Board. This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting, Officers of the Association, Host Churches, and other matters.

E. The TIME, PLACE, and PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational Meeting.

F. The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association and the host pastors of the Annual Meeting. It shall be their duty to assist the Association in planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Association. They shall receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form for the sessions of the Association which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business.

G. The CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes. This Committee shall receive all proposed changes and/or amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Tar River Baptist Association, and upon study of said changes and/or amendments make recommendations to the Association concerning said changes and/or amendments.

H. The CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to keep before the churches of the Association all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

I. The STRATEGY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Association in determining strategic objectives and staying on course in achieving them.

J. The PROPERTIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Association in properties administration. This Committee shall develop and recommend policies and procedures for using associational facilities and equipment.

K. The HISTORY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Association's life and work.

### ARTICLE XIII - INSTITUTIONAL AND AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES

The Institutional and Agency Representatives of the Convention shall include the following: Annuity Board, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes, Christian Higher Education, Religious Literature, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Missions. The representatives for these institutions and agencies shall be responsible for providing information to the churches during the year, and/or giving reports on the work of the institutions and agencies at the Annual Meeting of the Association.

### ARTICLE XIV - MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

The Mission Performance Councils shall undergird and give support to the work of program related ministries of the Association. Training leadership shall be a primary responsibility of these Councils. All Mission Performance Councils shall be under the supervision of the Associational Executive Board. These Mission Performance Councils are as follows: Seminary Extension, Ordination Advisory, Music Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Vacation Bible School, Recreation, Media Library, Pastoral Ministries, Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions Development, Youth Ministry, and Family Ministry.



## ARTICLE XV - DUTIES OF THE MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

A. The SEMINARY EXTENSION COUNCIL shall direct any Seminary Extension Program for the churches affiliated with the Association. This Council shall be composed of at least (5) members.

B. The ORDINATION ADVISORY COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to act only in an advisory capacity for churches seeking assistance in examining prospective candidates approved for ordination. This Council shall conduct its work within the guidelines of the Association.

C. The MUSIC COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. This Council shall plan and implement the music program of the Association. They shall recommend to the Program Committee the music for the Annual Meeting, and they shall enlist accompanists for all Associational Meetings.

D. The SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of the ASSISTeam to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate Associational Sunday School Work.

E. The DISCIPLESHIP TRAINING COUNCIL shall be composed of age level leaders (Preschool, Children, Youth, Adult) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the total Associational Discipleship Training Program.

F. The WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION COUNCIL shall consist of the leadership recommended by the WMU Nominating Committee and elected by the Associational WMU. This Council will have the responsibility of planning, promoting, conducting, and evaluating Associational WMU work.

G. The BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL shall be composed of the officers of the Associational Brotherhood. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, and evaluate the work of Associational Baptist Men and also the work of Associational Royal Ambassadors.

H. The VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. The Vacation Bible School Council Director is the leader of the VBS team and shall plan and promote the Associational VBS Clinic. The team of age-group VBS leaders who comprise this team shall be responsible for conducting the Associational VBS Clinic.

I. The RECREATION COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members whose duty it shall be to help plan, coordinate, promote, and conduct the entire recreation program of the Association. They shall be available to assist any Associational entity with the planning and conducting of recreational activities. The work of this Council includes setting up and supervising the Associational Basketball Program, and any other Associational Sports Programs that may be started. This Council will also plan, promote, and conduct the Annual Royal Ambassador Track Meet, and the Annual Royal Ambassador Car Competition.

J. The MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL shall consist of at least three (3) members. This Associational Church Media Library Organization is often referred to as TACMO. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to provide for the mutual sharing of inspiration and information for furthering the Church Media Center Ministry of the affiliated churches.

K. The PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL shall be composed of the following: (1) Associational Pastoral Ministries Director, (2) Church Administration Services Coordinator, (3) Deacon Ministry Coordinator, (4) Vocational Guidance Coor-

dinator, and (5) Church Weekday Education Coordinator, and any others that may be deemed necessary or advisable. The duties of this Council shall be to determine the pastoral ministries emphasis in the Associational Program and to schedule the events in cooperation with the total programming of the Association. The major task of the Council shall be the development and training of ministries through conferences, workshops, clinics, awareness meetings, retreats, and ministries support groups.

L. The EVANGELISM COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. It shall be the duty of this Council to plan and promote any evangelism programs, training projects, and rallies in the Association. It shall also be the responsibility of this Council to keep evangelism before the pastors and laypeople of the Association.

M. The STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for stewardship development and promotion within or among the churches of the Association. It will be the task of this Council to seek to lead the churches to set specific, attainable, measurable stewardship goals.

N. The MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall consist of at least seven (7) members. This Council shall be responsible for missions development in the total program of the Association. The Council shall not only be concerned with already established missions, mission work, and mission activities; it shall be concerned with beginning new mission work. It will be their responsibility to study the missionary needs of the Association and make recommendations concerning new work. They shall also recommend mission projects or activities with which the churches in the Association may cooperate. They shall strive to get each church in the Association to elect or appoint a Church Missions Development Council.

O. The YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall plan youth related ministries for the Association including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

P. The FAMILY MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for helping to plan, promote, and conduct any program emphasis related to family life. This Council should strive to include the needs of senior adults, single adults, marriage partners, parents, and children.

#### ARTICLE XVI - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

The Associational Council shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, the Directors of the various Program Councils of the Association, and three members at large. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to assist the Director of Missions in planning, coordinating, promoting, and executing the Associational Programs, making recommendations to the Associational Executive Board or to the Association in its Annual Fall Meeting. It shall also be the duty of this Council to plan the Annual Associational Calendar. This council shall meet quarterly on another Monday evening prior to each Associational Executive Board meeting, and at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator.

#### ARTICLE XVII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

A. The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of the Associational officers as set forth in Article IX, Director of Missions, along with key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Board members shall be members of the church they represent. If a church does not have all these leaders, it may appoint a representative for a committee prior to the

regular Annual Fall Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Associational Executive Board shall meet quarterly usually during March, June, September, and December on Monday night following the fourth Sunday of the month unless a conflict necessitates moving the meeting to Monday after the third or fifth Sunday. The Associational Executive Board may meet at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator for the purpose of transacting special or urgent business.

C. Although each church should earnestly strive to get its full contingent of key leaders to attend, there is no quorum requirement for transacting business at a regular or called meeting of the Associational Executive Board.

D. The Director of Missions is an ex officio member of the Executive Board and does not have the power to vote.

E. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as follows:

1. The Executive Board of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary, and to define his duties.

2. To act for the Association between regular session of the body.

3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.

4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.

5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the annual budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.

6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Board in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

## ARTICLE XVIII - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

## ARTICLE XIX - AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and the Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment(s) will be presented to the afternoon session and voted on no earlier than the evening session.

## ARTICLE XX - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order*.

## ARTICLE XXI - BUSINESS PROCEDURE

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with a prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator, and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. Any resolution to be presented to the Associational Executive Board and/or Annual Associational meetings must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Association and published in the Associational newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.

10. Reports of committees on Convention matters must be brief - that on missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to: Librarian of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina; *Biblical Recorder*, Raleigh, North Carolina; Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina; Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee and State Baptist Convention.

13. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

AFTERNOON SESSION

THEME: "Reaching Out To The Ends Of The Earth"

(Note from Clerk: Reports are not printed in the Proceedings. The reports are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

1. The 161st Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:15 p.m. by Gerald Nelms, Moderator.
2. Rev. Bill Wallace led the opening hymn, "I Love To Tell The Story."
3. Rev. DuPre Sanders, Pastor of Franklinton Baptist Church, welcomed everyone and read scripture from 1 Peter 2: 4-11, and led in the opening prayer.
4. Dr. C. Ray Pruette was appointed as parliamentarian.
5. Rev. Jimmy Pulliam presented the report from the Program Committee. A motion was made and seconded that the program be adopted as printed. Motion carried.

6. The following new pastors were recognized and welcomed to the Association: DuPre Sanders, Franklinton; Pete Stone, Sims; Jack Watson, Bailey; and Earl Rogers, Union View. Jeff Perkins was recognized as Youth Minister of Franklinton.

7. The histories of the host churches were read by Mrs. Margaret Pruette, Franklinton; Mrs. Jane Roberts, Community; and Rev. Earl Rogers, Union View.

8. Rev. Bill Wallace led in singing "Rescue the Perishing."

9. The Baptist Retirement Homes Report was presented by Dr. C. Ray Pruette. Dr. Bill Stillerman, representative of Retirement Homes, was introduced and spoke to the group.

10. Rev. Jimmy Creech presented the Baptist Hospital Report as printed. He introduced Mr. Wayne Murphy who spoke on Baptist Hospitals.

11. Rev. Bill Wallace presented the Baptist Children's Homes Report as printed. He introduced Mr. Charles Tanner who spoke on Children's Homes.

12. The *Biblical Recorder Report* was presented by Rev. Bill Wallace as printed. Dr. R.G. Puckett was introduced and spoke on *The Biblical Recorder*.

13. The Annuity Board Report was presented by Rev. John Butler as printed. Rev. James Lambert was introduced and spoke on The Annuity Board.

14. Special music was presented by Mrs. Wanda Thompson.

15. Sunday School Director, Marcia Aycock, introduced BREAK THROUGH, A Sunday School Growth and Improvement Campaign, to be held October 12-19, 1991. Mr. Robert Stewart from the Baptist State Convention talked with the group on Sunday School growth.

16. Rev. Bill Wallace led in singing "O Zion, Haste."

17. There was no miscellaneous business.

18. Mr. Gerald Nelms presented the Nominating Report as printed. He asked for a motion that would allow the Nominating Committee to fill in the blanks as needed. Motion was made, seconded, and passed.

19. The Executive Committee Report was presented by Mrs. Gertrude Davis as printed.

20. Mr. Sam Wood presented the Treasurer's Report as printed.

21. The Director of Missions Report was presented as printed. Rev. Bill Wallace announced that a mobile unit will be moved onto property at Strickland's Crossroads. This unit will be used in the Hispanic Ministry. Mrs. Elaine Lewis, Missions Development Director, announced a Work Day to be held on May 4, to prepare the unit for use. She expressed thanks to Carson and Maxine Barnes for allowing us to place the unit there. Rev. Bill Wallace expressed a desperate need for a computer in the Associational Office.

22. The hymn, "Send Me O Lord Send Me," was sung by all.

23. Rev. Leo Lowery read scripture from Matthew 28: 16-20.

24. Mrs. Sandra Wood presented special music.

25. After reading scripture from Luke 9: 23-26, Rev. Jimmy Pulliam delivered the Annual Sermon.

26. Moderator Gerald Nelms expressed thanks to the people on the program and to the hosting churches.

27. Rev. Earl Rogers gave thanks for the evening meal.

#### EVENING SESSION

28. The Tar River Associational Choir presented inspirational music.

29. Rev. Earl Rogers read scripture and led in prayer.

30. The hymn, "Send The Light," was sung by all.
31. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Credentials Committee Chairman, reported the following: 114 messengers, nine alternates, 26 pastors, 12 associational officers, and 35 guests, totaling 196 persons present, with 36 of our 47 churches represented.
32. Mr. Gerald Nelms gave the Resolutions Report and thanked everyone who had a part in the 161st Semi-Annual Meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association.
33. An offering was received for the Computer Fund.
34. The Tar River Associational Choir presented special music.
35. The hymn, "To God Be The Glory," was sung by all.
36. Dr. Roy J. Smith was our speaker for the evening message.
37. Rev. Jeff Hensley closed with prayer, followed by a choral benediction by the Associational Choir.



## **History of Franklinton Baptist Church**

The Franklinton Baptist Church was organized in 1858 with Dr. W.M. Wingate, president of Wake Forest College, as the first pastor. Services were held in The Franklin Institute building until a church building was built at the corner of South Main Street and West Green Street. This building was sold around 1890 to a negro congregation. Church services were held from that time on in the Ballard-Cheatham Building at the corner of East Mason Street and Front Street until the present sanctuary was built. The cornerstone for the present building was laid in 1893 and completed in 1895 at a cost of \$8,000.

During the early years, all races worshipped together at Franklinton Baptist Church. In 1860 the membership of the church was 34, with 14 of these being negro. The membership in 1865 was 67, with 37 of the members negro.

The church was taken into the Tar River Association in 1858. Soon after 1860, the Franklinton, Flat Rock, and Wake Forest churches were granted permission to leave the Tar River Association to help form a new association which later merged with the Raleigh Association. The Franklinton Church returned to the Tar River Association in 1959. Since 1959 the Franklinton Church has provided three moderators for the association. They were the Rev. Lloyd Jackson, Mr. Richard Morgan, and Dr. C. Ray Pruette.

Prior to 1903, only one major change had been made to the building. This was the addition of the classroom for the men. While Rev. T.B. Justice (1903-1909) was here, the baptistry was installed on the right of the pulpit and the choir on the left with three classrooms in back of the pulpit. This area remained this way until 1948 when Mr. Hubert H. Utley had it remodeled in memory of his wife which placed the choir and baptistry directly behind the pulpit.

From 1873 to 1903 the following ministers served as pastors of the church, Dr. William Royal, Dr. W.R. Brooks, Rev. C.A. Jenkins, Rev. A.G. McManaway, Rev.



Baylus Cade, Dr. John Mitchell, Rev. Jasper Howell, Rev. A.A. Butler, and Rev. J.B. Harrell.

The first parsonage was built while the Rev. T.B. Justice was pastor. This parsonage was used until 1970 when the present two-story brick dwelling was built at a cost of approximately \$40,000.

From the early history of the church there has been an organization for the women of the church. At first it was the Ladies Aid Society which later became the Woman's Missionary Society. Today it is known as the WMU.

In 1935, Rev. John Biddle was called as pastor and he served the church for five years. He was the first full-time pastor of the Franklinton Baptist Church. He saw the need for an education building and started making plans for one. With his faith, determination, a borrowed cement block making machine, one load of sand and a five dollar donation from a Methodist, the building was started. It was completed debt free and named "The Biddle Building."

The pastors from 1909 to 1952 that have not been mentioned were the Rev. G.B. Harrell, Rev. C.S. Dowell, Rev. S.L. Blanton, Rev. R.L. Randolph, Rev. D.D. Gross, Rev. Bruce Hartsell, Rev. Charles McConnell, Rev. W.B. Pittard, Jr., Rev. Herbert Luehrs, and Rev. Fate Thomas.

In the summer of 1952, Rev. Thomas J. Holmes was called as pastor. He soon saw the need of an additional education building. The church voted to borrow the money for this building. The plans for the building, as well as the supervision of the construction of the building, was done by Mr. P.P. Purnell. The building was completed at the approximate cost of \$37,000 and named "The Purnell Building."

Under the leadership of Rev. Dwight Cooper (1955-1960) a church council was appointed to serve only for advisory purposes, a part-time secretary was employed, and Junior Board of Deacons was started. Mr. Jim Annis was employed as a part-time educational director. Mr. Cooper had the privilege of being the pastor when the church celebrated its 100th anniversary. The 1950's were productive years not only in numerical growth but in spiritual growth also, especially among the youth.

Rev. Lloyd Jackson accepted the call to be pastor of the church in 1963 and served it well until 1968. During this time, the north wall of the church had to be replaced and worship services were held in the fellowship hall.

Growth took place in all areas of the church while Rev. Horace Jackson (1969-1974) was pastor. A new parsonage was built, the children's church and bus ministry were started, and women were elected deacons for the first time.

The first women to serve on the Board of Deacons were Mrs. Daisy Hale and Mrs. Annie Utley. They were ordained June 29, 1969. Since 1969 many women have been on the board with Mrs. Lucy Colbert being the chairman for the church year 1987-1988.

In 1976 Franklinton Baptist Church took part in the Bicentennial activities of our country. Rev. Deryl Holliday (1975-1977) led the church in these activities, using as the slogan, "Let Christ Freedom Ring Through Franklinton Baptist Church."

The Rev. Jack Sammons was pastor from March 1978 to January 1, 1984. Under his leadership renovation of both educational buildings and the outside of the church was completed. In 1980 the most extensive visitation program ever sponsored by the church was put into action. As a result of the "BAM" (Bold Awareness Ministry) program there was a definite increase in all areas of the church.

During the pastorate of Dr. Harry Kahn (1984-1990), repairs were made to the sanctuary, the church was incorporated, a long range planning committee was formed,

classes for the adults were held during Vacation Bible School, the Golden Agers group was formed and the kitchen was renovated.

On December 28, 1990, the Rev. DuPre Sanders became the pastor of the church. Growth is taking place in the Sunday School and worship services due to emphasis placed on visitation.

The Franklinton Baptist Church has ordained to preach the Gospel John R. Ball (1956), Jim Rivers (1976), Grady Edwards (1977) and James Payne (1980). Clyde Waiden, Jr. (1980) and Kurt Weeks (1990) were licensed into the gospel ministry.

The WMU, Brotherhood, the Homebound Department and Sunday School play an important part in the work of the church in this community.

Since the early 1960's the youth have had good leadership from the youth ministers and parents that have given support to them.

At the present time the Research Committee for the renovation of the sanctuary is hard at work. Most of the exterior work has been done and hopefully we will be ready to start in May on the interior.

The long history of this church has been made possible through the dedication and commitment of Christian men and women who made up its membership along with the many dedicated pastors that have served the church.

God has richly blessed the Franklinton Baptist Church during these 133 years in a marvelous way. Our prayer today is that we continue to seek the Lord's will in all of the future plans for the church.

## **History of Community Baptist Church**

In June 1988, several people met in Franklinton, North Carolina to discuss the possibility of forming a church. Twenty-one people agreed to form and become charter members of a Southern Baptist Church. The church was named Community Baptist Church and twenty-one persons joined by church letter. Charter member, Edith Toler provided the use of a vacant building on her property for church use.

In July 1988, the church elected Connie Woodlief treasurer and Lucy Fuller assistant treasurer and church clerk. Judy Hicks was elected assistant church clerk and Barry Burger as yokefellow. Don Appleford was elected Sunday School Director and he, Dawn Pierce, Connie Woodlief and Jane Roberts volunteered as Sunday School teachers. Alvin Roberts and Don Appleford were elected as deacons. Barry Burger, Parks Woodlief, Alvin Roberts and Don Appleford were elected to the Building and Grounds Committee. Edith Toler and Elaine Appleford were elected to the Hospitality Committee. In August 1988, Joe Pierce, a student at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary was called as pastor.

On August 14, 1988, Joe Pierce was ordained by Community Baptist Church.

In October 1988, Jeff Brooks, a student at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary was called as associate pastor and minister of youth. In August 1989, three of our youth joined the church by profession of faith and were baptized by Rev. Pierce. At the end of August 1989, Jeff Brooks resigned to fulfill seminary requirements in Supervised Ministry at Hope Valley Baptist Church, Durham, North Carolina.

In December 1988, the Articles of Incorporation were written and presented to Attorney Charles Draughn. Upon completion of the Articles of Incorporation, the

Department of the Secretary of State, State of North Carolina certified the Articles of Incorporation on December 11, 1989.

In October 1989 the church came under the watchcare of the Tar River Baptist Association and was received into full fellowship in October 1990.

In January 1990, Rev. Pierce resigned the pastorate to enter full time evangelism. Barry Burger and Alvin Roberts were elected to the Pulpit Committee and Jeff Brooks was called as pastor in February 1990.

In March 1990, Community Church elected its first Church Council. The Council is represented by a deacon, Sunday School director, Building and Grounds Chairperson, Missions Director, Church Clerk and a member of the laity. The pastor sits on the council as moderator. Also during March 1990, Home Bound Ministries was instituted by the church. Home Bound Ministries is a personal ministry of love and friendship to the residents of Zollieville Rest Home.

In the spring of 1990, Royal Ambassadors began on a limited basis and by the spring of 1991, the La Chambone Chapter of Royal Ambassadors of Community Baptist Church was recognized by the Baptist State Convention.

In March 1991, Jeff Brooks resigned as pastor and accepted the call as Minister to the Inner City, Greenfield Baptist Church, Wilmington, North Carolina.

## **History of Union View Baptist Church**

On July 3, 1944, the Union View Baptist Church was organized with Red Garner from the First Baptist Church in Henderson bringing the message, and the Reverend A.W. Icard, who came to Franklinton in April 1944 and preached a revival, then later started preaching twice a month, was called as pastor and served the church until March 1955.

The church was organized in a one-room building that was located on the adjoining lot to the present church building where the parsonage was before moving it to Franklin Street. The one-room building and lot was later purchased from Mr. J.P. Jenkins. It was in this one-room building that the church was organized into a Missionary Baptist Church.

The church was organized with the following charter members of which the following are dead: Mr. and Mrs. Nick Hopgood, Mr. Clem Williams, Mrs. Mattie Tant, Mrs. Naomi Williams, Mrs. Annie Jackson, Mrs. Cora Lee May, and Mr. and Mrs. Lummie Bridges. The whereabouts of Mr. Frank Edwards is questionable.

The Sunday School was organized in March 1944 before the church organized. The prayer meeting began October 7, 1945. The Daniels Cottage prayer band that was named by Mrs. Tommy Sudden and began under the direction of Reverend Tommy Sudden, was started in 1947, was held on Sunday nights originally, but has been changed to Saturday nights in more recent years.

It was near the year of 1948 that Mr. Joe Peace Jenkins gave the lot on which the present church building was erected, and the first service in this church was October 3, 1948; but full-time service did not begin until 1955.

In March of 1955, Reverend A.W. Icard resigned the church, and the Reverend Bob Clegg supplied until the Reverend W.C. Barham came on June 26, 1955 and was pastor until October 27, 1957. After the leaving of Reverend Barham, different ministers supplied until the Reverend Marvin Dameron came to Union View in Janu-

ary, 1958 and remained until July 25, 1965. Upon the departure of Reverend Dameron, the Reverend Robert Brooks supplied until the Reverend Glenn Short was called in September, 1965. Upon the departure of Reverend Dameron, the Reverend Robert Brooks supplied until the Reverend Glenn Short was called in September, 1965. Reverend Short served until 1970. After others supplied the pulpit, Reverend Joe Wren was called as pastor in 1971. He served the church until 1974. Again, others supplied the pulpit until Reverend Larry Boswell was called as pastor in 1975. He served the church until August, 1978. The Reverend Norman Baird, a native of Ireland, served as interim pastor from that point until June 1979. At this time, the church called Reverend David Schell as pastor. Following Reverend Schell's resignation, Reverend Bob Sherrill was called as pastor. He served until September 1983. Reverend Ed Revelle was called as our pastor and served from February 1984 until June 1989. Rev. Clyde Waiden, Jr. served as interim pastor from June 1989 until February 1990. At that time, our present pastor, Rev. Earl Rogers, Jr. was called.

Through the planning and organization of both the pastors and members of the church, Union View has experienced a rapid growth since 1944. In addition to the growth mentioned, a WMU was started by Mrs. Marvin Dameron and Mrs. Rosa Colbert, and has grown to include GA's, RA's, YBW, Baptist Women, and Acteens. A Sunday School Outreach along with a "Deacon of the Month" programs have been established. In addition, a regular tape ministry to the shut-in members has been activated.

In addition, there have been four ministers that have gone out from the church: Reverend F.G. Alford, Reverend H.D. Harris, Reverend Reid Winstead, and Bobby Ray Harris, with two ministers within the church, James Weaver and Perry Jordon.

It was in 1962 that the two rooms and vestibule, installation of windows and purchasing of an organ and the bricking of the church was completed. In 1963, the church organized a mission at the county jail and the Pine Rest Home. In May of 1967, the parsonage was moved to Franklin Street.

In more recent years, some Sunday School rooms have been renovated and a fellowship hall has been added. A nice sound system has also been installed, and the church has been incorporated.

Our present Music Director is Mr. Tommy McGhee.

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association has met two times since the last Annual Meeting.

DECEMBER 16, 1990

Moderator for the session was Gerald Nelms. Thirty-nine were present from sixteen churches. Rev. Bill Wallace reported that the ASSISTeam had been requested to help in one of our churches. A Sunday School Enlargement Campaign is being planned.

Rev. Billy Tharrington reported that the plans are underway for the Evangelism Conference in March.

Nanette Warren reported that youth and adults assisted with music for the Annual Meeting and for the Joint Thanksgiving Services. A living Christmas Tree was presented at Spring Hope.

Director of Missions Bill Wallace commended everyone for the best year yet, budget wide. The mobile unit is ready for set up at Strickland's Crossroads. The Christmas Toy Store merchandise was estimated to be worth \$7,000.00-\$8,000.00. Approximately \$2,000.00 was given in cash to purchase Bibles and toys. Over 100 families were helped and well over 200 children. Nine people were saved. Mr. Wallace hopes to lead two teams to Brazil in August 1991.

Vice Moderator Rev. Jimmy Pulliam expressed appreciation to our Director of Missions and presented a gift to him from the Minister's Conference.

MARCH 25, 1991

Moderator for the session was Gerald Nelms. Forty-five were present from 23 churches. WMU Director Nan Jones announced the Annual WMU Spring Meeting to be held April 8, 1991, at the Spring Hope Baptist Church.

Director of Missions Bill Wallace announced the RA Track Meet at Southern Nash on April 27, 1991. He expressed the need for participation in the Associational Choir which will be singing at the Semi-annual meeting on April 22, at Franklinton Baptist Church. Mr. Wallace also announced a Sunday School Growth and Improvement Campaign for the week of October 12-29, 1991. An Early Bird VBS Clinic for pastors and directors will be held on March 26, 1991. The Associational VBS Clinic for workers will be held at the Spring Hope Baptist Church on April 29, 1991. Concerning the Migrant Ministry, J.T. Mercado will finish his work at Southeastern Seminary in May and will be moving to Buies Creek, NC, where he will attend Campbell University. Through the Praxis Program of the Home Mission Board, we have secured two workers for ten weeks. These workers will be funded by the Home Mission Board. They will begin in June 1991. A modular classroom unit for Hispanics living here permanently will be placed at Strickland's Crossroads on property provided by Carson and Maxine Barnes. Services should begin the first Sunday in April 1991. Our Semi-annual Meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association is scheduled for Monday, April 22, at the Franklinton Baptist Church with the Community and Union View Churches assisting.

### **Director of Mission's Report**

The work of the Tar River Baptist Association continues to be exciting and challenging. God is blessing, and new vistas of mission opportunity are constantly being revealed. In order to take advantage of our mission opportunities we need two primary things from our churches: (1) Volunteers, and (2) Funding. The only limitations Tar River Baptist Association has in "reaching out to the ends of the earth" are the limitations we place upon ourselves by failing to be available, and by failing to be generous and sacrificial in our giving.

It is our plan to begin a new Hispanic Ministry at Stricklands Crossroads in Nash County. We hope to begin services there on May 5, 1991. Through the Praxis Program of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Bap-

tist State Convention of North Carolina, we will have the services of Eric Thompson and Alfredo Granillo, Jr. for ten weeks this summer to assist with the new work at Strickland's Crossroads. Eric has shown interest in continuing after the summer ends. So, Eric Thomspon will serve as our Hispanic Minister in a year-round ministry at Strickland's Crossroads.

J.T. Mercado will be leaving the area to attend Campbell University in Buies Creek, North Carolina. He will conclude his work with us on May 12, 1991. We are currently trying to find a replacement so the work can continue at Sandy Creek without interruption.

Many people have been asking about the new proposed Associational Center. As I have stated on numerous occasions, I'm opposed to taking "program money" to pay debt service on a new building. We NEED the new building, and WE CAN FUND IT WITHOUT USING PROGRAM MONEY. How? We can do it by enlisting individuals to give OVER AND ABOVE what they are currently giving. If we could find 250 people who would give \$1,000.00 over a five year period, we could build the new facility and adequately furnish it. I'm not talking about a tremendously large sum of money - just \$200.00 per year for five years. I'm sure that out of the 13,547 members of the Tar River Baptist Family, there are at least 250 members who could give \$1,000.00 over a five year period. Will you be one of them? We need your help NOW! After all, we only have about three and one-half years to get something started or the property will revert to the donor. Surely we don't want to lose our fine piece of land in Louisburg. Let's get on with the task, and build that building to the glory of God. I'll be the first to pledge \$1,000.00 over the next five years. Who will be next???????????

## **Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina**

For 106 years Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina (BCH) has been giving children a chance at life. In 1990, we formalized that phrase into our first state-wide fund-raising campaign.

The "Give a child a chance!" campaign seeks to raise \$11 million over three years to expand Cameron Boys Camp, boost general operating income and increase endowment. The campaign total is, thus far in gifts and pledges, \$8,563,752.

We also began the Gregg Children's Center for before and after school care in August 1990. The Davidson County program offers security to children of working couples, who don't have to go home to empty houses anymore.

Some of the new endowment earnings will increase training to help the staff deal with everchanging needs among the 1,000 children and families they serve each year.

Baptist Men of North Carolina began construction in 1990 on the new Tommy and Jeanie Eller Chuckwagon at Cameron. Their generosity saved BCH approximately \$75,000 in construction costs.

Children's hopes were also bolstered by the 1991 return of the Thanksgiving Offering voted by messengers to the 1989 state convention. While suffering through its 12-year absence, BCH lost more than \$1 million in revenue.

In the change from a Homes and Hospital Offering to the Thanksgiving Offering, BCH is in the midst of an 18-month period without a special collection, a period

that encompasses more than an entire fiscal calendar year. For the past five years that special collection has meant \$400,000 to the ministry, a sum that will be difficult to make up in the 1990-91 budget. Some churches aware of the difficulty, began receiving the Thanksgiving Offering in 1990.

The Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning from the churches. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our North Carolina churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. This is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

In August 1990, BCH signed an agreement with Gaston County Department of Social Services to operate two emergency care homes owned by the county. That raises to seven the number of emergency care homes BCH operates. That service, in which a child at risk of abuse or neglect can receive shelter right away, is the service most in demand throughout the state. Children stay a maximum of 60 days while BCH works with the custodian to determine a long-term plan of care.

BCH celebrates this year the 20th anniversary of the founding of Broyhill Home, our westernmost campus, in Waynesville/Clyde. With the help of J.E. Broyhill and his family, the home was opened in 1971 on 91 hilly acres. It has capacity for 48 children in group care and for eight girls in emergency care.

Baptist Children's Homes has a 106-year history. But its history is just the knot that ties it to a boundless, unbroken ribbon of promise that stretches beyond the future to wrap children and families with eternal blessings.

## **This is What is Happening in North Carolina in 1991**

- \* There are now 2,162 North Carolina churches and associations contributing to retirement plans.
- \* North Carolina has 1,972 signed Cooperative Agreements! More than any other state!
- \* The number of churches participating at the old Plan A level of \$33.24 has decreased to less than 100.
- \* The average annuitant in North Carolina receives \$276.39 per month.
- \* North Carolina has 3,436 members making contributions to Annuity Board retirement plans.
- \* There are 1,889 annuitants receiving benefits each month in North Carolina - \$522,109.84 each month!
- \* It is exciting to think about what has been done to help ministers retire with dignity. Strong efforts have been made to make all of our churches (and ministers) aware of the opportunities and the need to act on them.
- \* But there is still so much to be done! Consider these facts:
  - Only 64 percent of our churches are participating in our retirement plans - even after all these years of opportunity.

- Of this 64 percent, many do not actually make contributions. The minister does this on his own.
- Small contributions make the annuitant's benefits small:  
In North Carolina
  - 175 receive less than \$50
  - 463 receive less than \$100
  - 1,007 receive less than \$200
  - 1,295 receive less than \$300
- We have 151 churches that have signed the Cooperative Agreement, but still make no contribution.
- We have 457 churches that are making contributions but still have not signed the Cooperative Agreement.

Suffice it is to say that there is a GREAT challenge still before us to help ministers prepare for the future and to help churches be responsible employers.

## **Baptist Hospital Report to Associations 1990**

“The largest health-science building program ever in North Carolina has changed the landscape on Hawthorne Hill, and the changes continue in rapid succession. . . One thing that hasn't changed is the institution's tradition for delivery of compassionate health care. That will never change.” This statement, from Dr. Charles P. Nicholson, Jr., Baptist Hospital Trustee and Chairman of the Medical Center Board of Directors, is both a report and a commitment.

Another building in this \$190 million expansion program has recently been completed and occupied. The Clinical Sciences building will house most of the Medical Center's ambulatory services, and has been termed a “medical supermarket,” where patients may do “one-stop shopping.” The building will also accommodate an Ambulatory Surgery Unit, Medical Center Administrative Offices, and other functions. Nearing completion, is the Day Care Center for children of medical center employees. Under construction, is an addition to the MRI (Magnetic Resonance Imaging) Building, and a significant addition to the Patient/Visitor Parking Deck. Construction on the Center on Aging Building is scheduled to begin in early 1991 with the completion date set for the spring of 1993.

The purpose of all these new facilities, according to hospital president, Len B. Preslar, Jr., is to “enable us to respond to patient needs better than ever before.” In addition to continuation and improvement of many established procedures, several new diagnostic and treatment programs have been started recently. The Organ Transplant program added a new dimension when it performed the first single-lung transplant in North Carolina. Bone marrow transplants are also being performed now in our Baptist Hospital. A Cranio-facial Clinic, to correct major deformities of the skull and upper face during the first year of life, opened recently. New laser technology provides an improved method for clearing out atherosclerotic deposits in the carotid arteries of the neck. New surgical techniques make possible better treatment of complicated retinal detachment. Orthopedic Surgeons began use of the Ilizarov Technique for the repair and lengthening of broken bones. New approaches are be-



ing used effectively in the treatment of children with Cerebral Palsy. Bowman Gray/Baptist Hospital is the only medical center in the nation using and evaluating Clinodean, a non-narcotic pain killer which has proven effective in controlling pain following surgery and for cancer patients.

Through these various services we provided 210,456 days of care for 22,607 patient admissions last year. In addition to these, there were approximately 388,000 ambulatory patient visits in the various clinics, the Emergency Department, the Day Hospital, and in Ambulatory Surgery. These patients came from all across North Carolina and from thirty-four other states. Also the number of patients being referred to us from foreign countries is increasing as the reputation of the Medical Center spreads throughout the world.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to strengthen its reputation both as a service agency and as a teaching facility. Last year, the department provided more than 29,000 ministries to hospital patients, almost 19,000 services to families, and more than 14,000 services for hospital and church staff members and their families. The Minister's Care Plan, a joint program with the Baptist State Convention, had 1,446 sessions with more than 200 different clergy families last year. The new Missionary Counseling and Support Services Program saw 48 individuals in its first six months. The Division of Clinical Pastoral Education/Chaplaincy had 53 students enrolled.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1990, the hospital received \$692,946.24 through the Cooperative Program and \$271,361.24 through the Homes and Hospital Offering and direct gifts. Cooperative Program Funds are used for the Department of Pastoral Care, and other church gifts help to provide Benevolent Care for financially needy patients. The hospital staff and patients are most grateful for this continuing financial support.

Motion was made to accept, seconded and carried. Mrs. Jeanette Ayscue presented the Nominating Committee report as printed asking permission for the committee to finalize report as soon as possible. Motion was made to accept, seconded and carried. Mr. Richard Morgan presented the Finance Committee report and proposed budget for 1992 as printed with the addition of Migrant Ministries Pastor's salary \_\_\_\_\_ to be added to total making our total budget for 1992 \$77,221.82. Motion was made to accept, seconded and carried.

23. Mr. Gilford Bufkin was recognized to give the Credentials Report. He reported that 37 of our 47 churches were represented with 115 messengers, 10 alternates, 24 pastors, nine associational officers, 13 guests from the association, and 38 from outside the association giving a total of 209 registered.

24. Rev. Dannie Hayes was recognized to present the resolutions committee report. (See attached report).

25. The evening worship was opened with singing led by Michelle Owens. Special music was presented by Mrs. Glenda Parrish.

26. The message on "Volunteers for Jesus" was delivered by Mr. Ernie Grisby, a layman from Winterville, NC.

27. Mr. Gerald Nelms expressed his appreciation to everyone for their help and support for the past two years during his term as moderator as he passed the gavel to our newly elected moderator, Rev. Jimmy Pulliam.

28. The meeting was adjourned with a closing prayer by our new moderator, Rev. Jimmy Pulliam.

## History of Flat Rock Baptist Church

Flat Rock Baptist Church was organized by a group from Cross Roads Baptist Church and was fully organized on July 10, 1824, when additional members were added from Cedar Creek and Poplar Springs Churches to total 21 members. Moses Neal was chosen deacon, Jones Cooke clerk, and elder John Purefoy pastor. Zachariah Allen preached the first sermon. When organized, the church joined the Raleigh Association. In the year 1831 the church joined the Tar River Association.

Even before the founding of the church there was a group of women who met as a part of the church. This group which met in 1823 was called the "Flat Rock Female Missionary Society." Elder Thomas D. Mason preached the first missionary sermon taken from Isaiah 42:3. The name "Flat Rock" was chosen due to the many large, flat rocks that are located near the church.

In 1864 due to the Civil War and the great depression a committee of three was appointed and collected for the pastor's salary fifteen barrels of wheat and fifteen barrels of corn.

In 1871 Elder W.A. Barrett was pastor and baptized 55 persons. Twenty-seven white and 28 colored. In the first record book there is a portion of the roll book for the Negro members. In 1873 the church paid the colored members \$50.00 for their interest in the church house thus signifying the time that the church was segregated.

On January 11, 1875 a member asked the church if he might sell brandy of his own make. Answered by the church that no member be allowed to make, buy, or sell ardent spirits only as a medicine.

Also in the year 1875 the subject of footwashing was thoroughly discussed by the church. It was agreed by all the members present that footwashing was not an ordinance. On May 11, 1877, J.R. Jones was ordained to the gospel ministry. On May 12, 1884, W.H. Beddingfield was licensed to preach. In 1897 the church building was dedicated.

J.D. Morris was licensed to preach on November 28, 1899. The Rev. Alford A. Pippin was pastor from 1900-1913. In 1904 there was continued evidence of the strong discipline of the church. In 1907 a member was denied the right of joining another church until he had paid up his back dues.

In 1911 it was ordered by the church that no bottled drinks be sold on the church grounds except by the ladies of the church and that the proceeds go to the church fund.

In 1912 the church voted that every male member give at least ten cents a month and that every woman and child give at least five cents to the support of the church. The first collection was taken to buy a bell for the church. On January 19, 1913 a committee was appointed to put the bell in place.

On October 2, 1913 the church voted to buy the acre of school land. The price was \$35.00.

The envelope system of giving was first started in 1914.

The Rev. James B. Davis was pastor from 1915-1920.

On March 10, 1917 a church member was dismissed for misbehavior at another church, thus misrepresenting Flat Rock.

In 1919 the church again stated that if a member missed three meetings then a committee would be appointed to see them.

In 1920 the church took a charge against a man and his wife because they neglected their children.

On March 13, 1920 there was no meeting due to the great outbreak of flu.

On February 12, 1921 the church voted to begin cutting timber to frame the new part of the church. Wings were added on each side of the building under the direction of Pastor Dan T. Henley in 1920-1921.

From 1921-1926 Rev. Charles B. Howard served as pastor. Dr. Howard later became a well-known Bible professor at Cambell University.

From 1926-1930 Rev. J. Clyde Yates served as pastor.

From 1930-1935 Rev. E.H. "Eck" Gattis was pastor.

In July 1936 electric lights were installed in the church.

From 1936-1940 Rev. James B. Davis served as pastor.

On January 21, 1940 Flat Rock Baptist Church burned to the ground, the origin of the fire was unknown. The present sanctuary was erected in its place and a service of dedication held on August 30, 1942.

From 1941-1951 Rev. A.W. Icard served as pastor.

In October of 1948 W.C. Barham was licensed to preach.

From 1951-1956 Rev. Billy Gordon was pastor.

In 1951 the number of deacons was increased from eight to 12 and a rotation system implemented. On July 20, 1952 the church voted to be a full-time church with preaching every Sunday.

On July 19, 1953 Winston Gattis Perry and Ertle James Lawson were licensed to preach.

In 1954 the church voted to secure plans for building a parsonage. The Rev. J.C. Raper served as pastor from February 1956 - June 1957. In 1956 the church borrowed the money to complete the parsonage.

The Rev. Grady Faulk was pastor from November 1957 - December 1963. In 1958 the church voted to purchase an electric organ.

The loan on the parsonage was paid and a service of dedication held at the parsonage on November 20, 1959. Several additions have been made to the parsonage since its completion. In 1989-90 the interior was renovated and new carpet and appliances were installed.

On November 20, 1960 the church voted to secure plans for an educational building that would be adequate for the church. These plans were presented on January 1, 1961 and accepted by the church. In 1961-62 the educational building was constructed. The Rev. W.J. Taylor served as pastor from February 1964 - August 1966.

The Rev. Floyd Benfield was pastor from October 1966 - May 1973. The debt on the educational building was retired in September 1967. In March 1968 central air conditioning was installed. In 1969 the exterior of the church was brick veneered. In 1970 the sanctuary interior was completely renovated and a new piano and organ purchased. In 1971 new pulpit furniture was purchased.

The Rev. Don Bickers was pastor from October 1973 - May 1976.

The Rev. Billy Britt was pastor from September 1976 - September 1979.

In 1978 the sanctuary was carpeted and cushions were installed in the pews and new pews were added in each wing section. The Rev. Gary Anderson was pastor from February 1980 - September 1989. In 1986 stained glass windows were added.

The Rev. Gary McNair was called as pastor in June 1990.

The history and background of Flat Rock Baptist Church is both exciting and glorious. The faith of the people has always been strong and the love of God has been great. As we enter the last years of the 20th century at Flat Rock Baptist Church, we expect our membership to continue to grow as new families move into our com-

munity. God has richly blessed the people at Flat Rock over the years. May Flat Rock continue to be the "Light House" in our community and always minister to those in need of spiritual growth.

## History of Beulah Baptist Church

Beulah Christian Church was founded when a group of dissenters withdrew from Rolesville Baptist Church, under the leadership of Mrs. Virginia Terrell. The group then met just southeast of Rolesville crossroads, which today is a vacant lot. There was no building available so they began to meet under a bush arbor located on Pulley Town Road.

Later in 1887, a piece of land near Mitchell's Pond was given by Calvin Mitchell on which to build. Mitchell also sawed the timber which had been donated for the purpose of building. The first church building was one room, lit by kerosene lamps, and a wood stove over to one side for heating.

Services being held in the new church were being interrupted by Sunday morning swimmers in the pond above the old mill site. In September of 1931, a business meeting was held to discuss repair of the church.

At that time, because of the Sunday Swimmers, a discussion was held to relocate the church on land that had been donated by Burwell Perry. By May of 1932, the first service was held at the new (and present) location.

In 1940, repairs were needed and wings were added to the church and a new pulpit installed.

In 1944, two classrooms were added; the top was restored; and the outside painted. The church floors were sanded in 1950 and the inside was painted. New pews were installed along with a piano and heating.

The congregation grew in membership; and by 1959, more classrooms were needed and built.

In 1962, the church was greatly improved by adding stained glass windows. These beautiful windows were placed in honor of or in memory of loved ones. At this time, the decision was made to brick the church.

Beulah was joined in services with New Hope Christian Church, and the pastor commuted to accommodate both services each Sunday. In 1963, the decision was made to emerge independently; so Beulah began on its own.

In 1967, the church purchased two acres of land from Ms. Lucy Perry Yeargin, and a parsonage was built just north of Highway 96. The parsonage is a three-bedroom totally electric home with a fireplace. It has a pastor's study, a living room, dining room, family room, and two baths. It also has an adjoining garage.

The church was without water or bathroom facilities; so in 1968, the Adult Men's Class had the well dug. The Young Men's Class bought the pump, and the Intermediate Boys' Class purchased and installed the water fountain. Bathroom facilities were completed between 1969 and 1970.

In 1975, a fellowship building was built; and in 1978, the Women's Fellowship raised money and had the fellowship building bricked.



In 1979, the baptistry was added with funds from the church. The pews were covered by members in honor of or in memory of loved ones. The steeple was added to the top by the Missionary Women.

In 1982, a picnic shelter was built in honor of Ms. Mamie Pulley, the oldest member still attending our congregation.

By 1985, the church was found to be so infested with termites that it was beyond repairs. At this time, plans were made to build a new church on the same site. By March 9, 1986, the new church had been completed and the first services held.

In October 1989 Beulah Church petitioned the Tar River Baptist Association for membership and was received under the watchcare of the association. In October 1990 Beulah was accepted as a member church of the Tar River Baptist Church in good standing.

On June 23, 1991, James Pulley, a member of Beulah Church was ordained into the gospel ministry.

Today, Beulah is even more beautiful than ever with its original stained glass windows still on each side as in the old church. The picture of Jesus kneeling (which used to overlook the baptistry) is now out front overlooking passers-by. The lighted steeple, like a beacon, can be seen for miles around by anyone seeking restitution through God's loving, fulfilling and forgiving words.

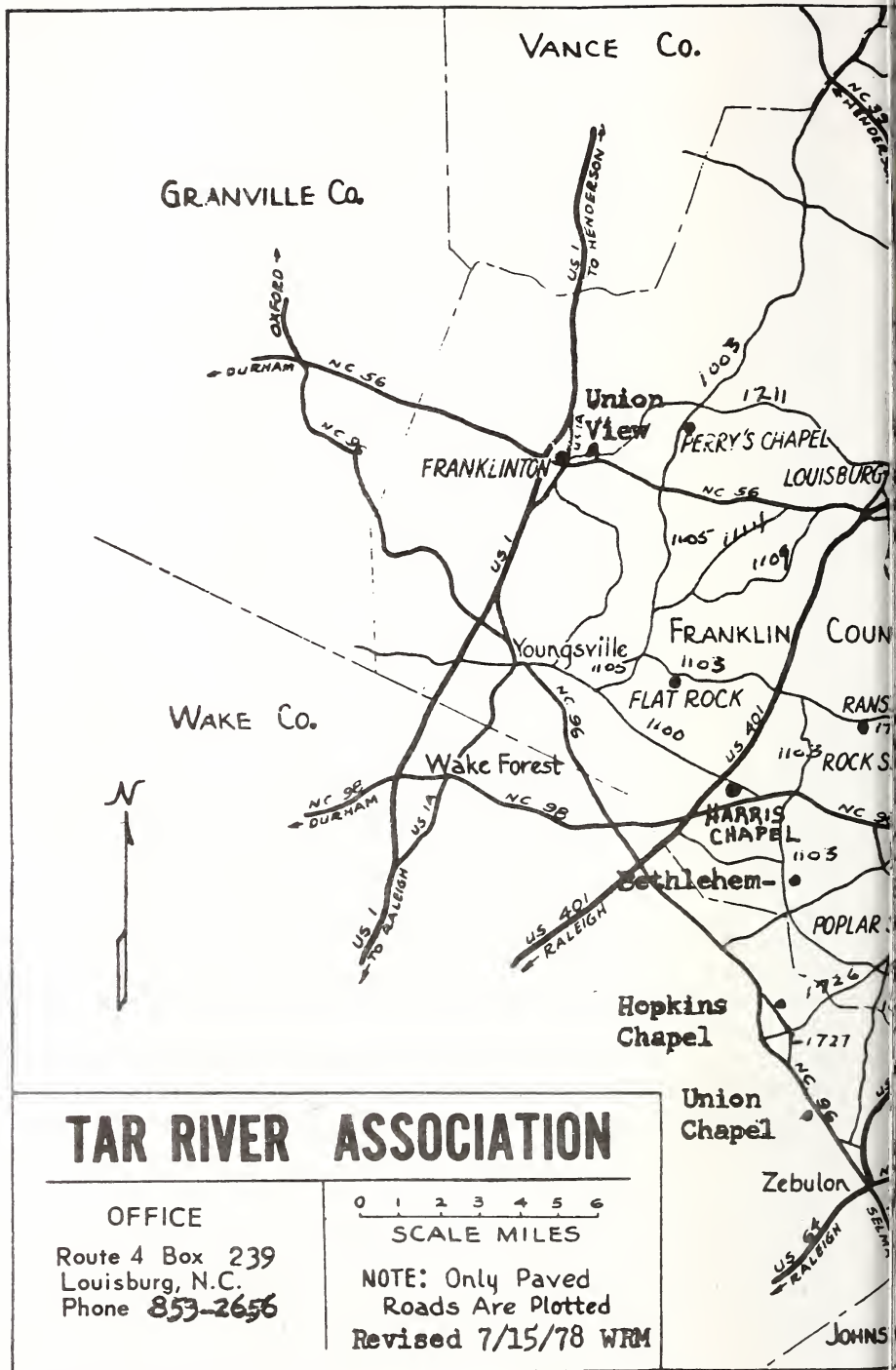
Roll call of the churches indicated 24 people present, representing 11 churches. Four people were present representing the Hispanic Ministry at Strickland's Crossroads. Minutes of the March 25, 1991 meeting were read and approved.

New pastors and staff recognized were Rev. David Crumpler, pastor of Duke Memorial Baptist Church, and Eric Thompson and Alfredo Granillo, ministers to the Hispanics at Strickland's Crossroads.

Mr. Epp Catlett was appointed parliamentarian.

WMU Director Nan Jones announced the WMU Fall Workshop to be held September 9, 1991, at Louisburg Baptist Church.

Bill Wallace reported that the Sunday School Enlargement and Improvement Campaign to be held October 12-29, 1991, will include evangelism emphasis. A training session will be held each night followed by an evangelistic service. There has been a decline in Sunday School attendance & enrollment. Specialists will be assigned to each church to help and offer suggestions. Only those churches who participate will benefit.



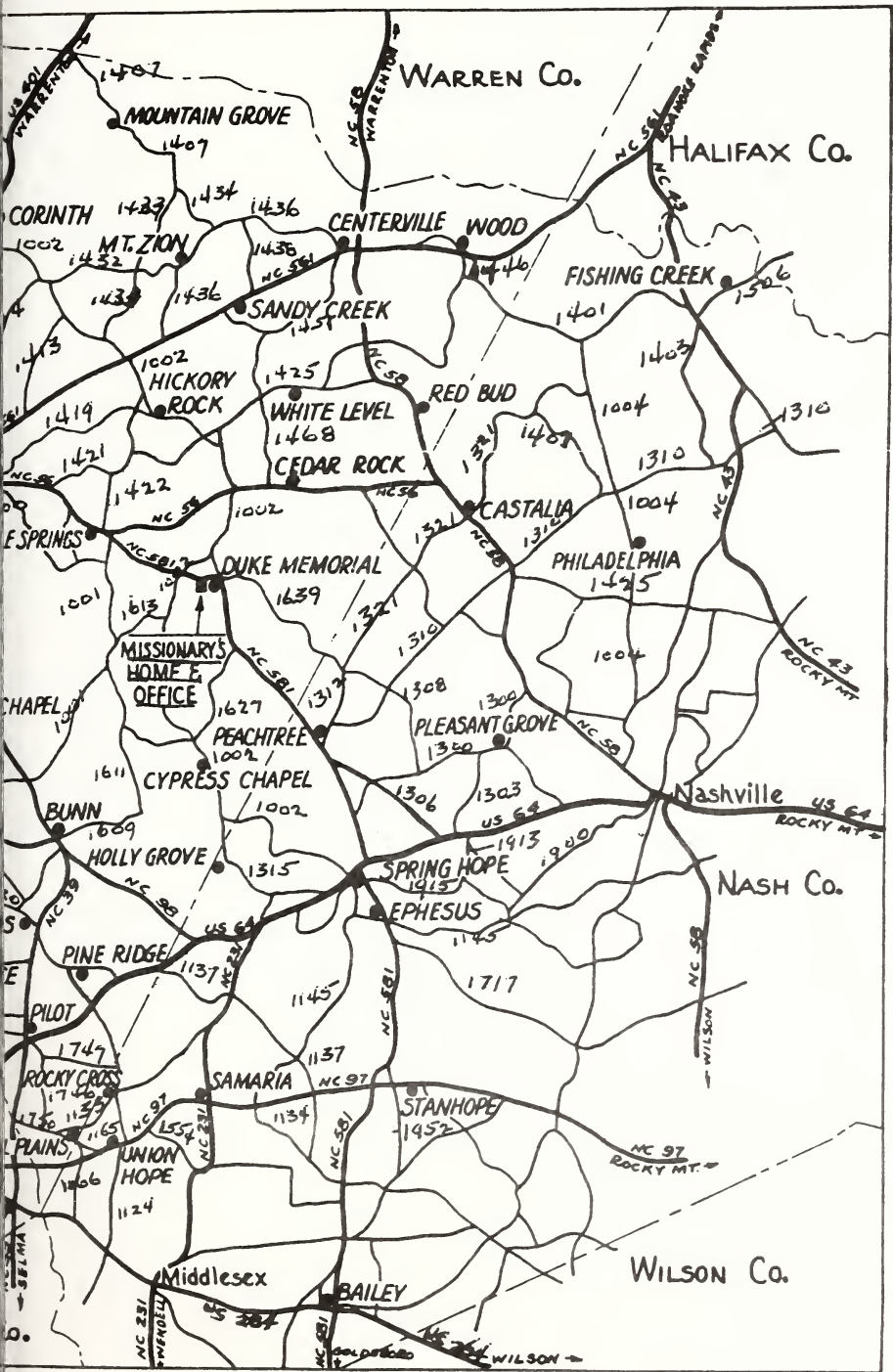

Bill Wallace reported on Church Training. The emphasis is to train pastors and let them know what is available to the churches.

In reporting on Evangelism, Mr. Wallace stated there would be an area-wide crusade asking other churches to join with us. It has been suggested that the name Evangelism Conference be changed to Evangelism Revival.

Richard Morgan presented the Treasurer's Report and also reported on Stewardship. He expressed thanks for gifts from the churches. Stated that money is scarce and we're spending as little as possible.

Music Director Nanette Warren stated that she was pleased with the selections presented by the Associational Choir at the semi-annual Spring meeting. She is going to the DOM Conference at Wingate to present "I Am the Association." The next music emphasis will be in August during Church Music Emphasis Week.

Eric Thompson reported on the Hispanic Ministry. Services began at Strickland's Crossroads June 16, 1991. Twenty-four were present, and two accepted the Lord. Alfredo Granillo presented the message. In addition to the messages, English classes and recreation will also be offered. Some of their needs are as follows: transportation to and from church, materials for children such as paper and crayons, a large meal once a month and refreshments each Sunday, help with VBS, clothing closet, food pantry, toys, and most of all our prayers for the ministry.

Bill Wallace stated that a sign showing "Spanish Christian Church" had been painted for \$50.00, and a volleyball and net has been purchased for \$58.00, folding chairs have been bought for \$200.00 and \$160.00 is needed for more folding chairs. One hundred Spanish Hymnals have been ordered for \$5.50 each. Money is needed for these hymnals. All of these items can be projects in which churches can participate.

Bill Wallace announced the following upcoming events: Prayer Retreat and Picnic for Pastors/Staff/Spouses to be held June 22, 1991, at Perry's Pond. Pastors' Conference at Pleasant Grove Baptist Church on July 8, with Robert Stewart from the SBC speaking on BREAKTHROUGH. A Tour of the Foreign Mission Board and Lottie Moon Burial Place on July 15, for Pastors/Staff/Spouses.

Mr. Wallace stated that he enjoys his work and is glad of the opportunity to be the Director of Missions of the Tar River Baptist Association. He asked for prayer that he will be a good pastor to others.

We have three years and three and a half months in which to construct a new office building on the property located in Louisburg donated by the Cliff Benson family. One plan of financing that has been suggested is to try to enlist 250 people, five or six donors in each church, who would be willing to give \$1,000.00 each over the next five years. Mr. Wallace stated that he would be the first to put \$1,000.00 on the line.

After several prayer requests, Bill Wallace led in the closing prayer. Meeting was adjourned.

September 30, 1991

Our meeting was called to order by Moderator, Gerald Nelms. We sang Hymn No. 266, played on the piano by Nanette Warren. The devotion followed as Rev. Bill Wallace shared the text from I Peter 5. He told us to always "cast all of our cares" upon Jesus. Gertrude Stone then proceeded with the roll call of Churches with 28 members present. She also made an announcement concerning the church letters for the church clerks to fill out and have back to the Tar River Associational Center by October 25. Moderator Gerald Nelms had the reading of the minutes and they were approved.

During the recognition of new pastors, church staff, and executive board members, two new members were recognized from Hopkins Chapel and Sandy Creek. Epp Catlett was appointed as the Parliamentarian for our meeting.

Nan Jones reported that 90 women attended the WMU Fall Workshop. She also noted a correction in the date for the Associational GA Lock-In. The date for that event will be November 15. All leaders were asked to let their GA leaders know of that correction. There will be a Prayer Retreat sponsored by the Baptist Women during the Week of Prayer on November 4. It will be held at Duke Memorial and is for all adults and High School Seniors to attend. Jeanie Whitehead, a leader with our Baptist State Convention, will lead the retreat. Nan encouraged all to attend. A fellowship will follow the retreat.

Billy Tharrington reported that the Evangelism Conference will be held October 9 in Raleigh. Don Murray will be the guest speaker for that event. He encouraged all the churches to call on the Evangelism Committee for any help that they could provide, especially those churches without pastors at this time.

Richard Morgan presented the Stewardship report as well as the Proposed Budget for the 1991-1992 year. Various line items were explained by him. He thanked the churches for their giving this past year.

Nanette Warren thanked all those who had sung at the Hispanic Mission. She encouraged participation in the upcoming Mass Choir at our State Convention. She announced that a retreat would be held for Volunteer Music Directors and she has hopes that those music leaders within our Association will be able to attend.

Jimmy Pulliam brought our Associational Council report. Two recommendations were stated to the Executive Board. The first recommendation read: "The Tar River Baptist Association Council recommends we clear the lot in Louisburg in preparation for the office center and pay for this from funds in the Building Account. The recommendation was put in motion by Roger Hensley and Billy Tharrington seconded that motion. Discussion followed. A bid has been submitted to the Association. Moderator Gerald Nelms presented the information regarding that bid. Other bids will be sought and will be compared. The bid that best fits the needs of the job will be selected. The recommendation was approved unanimously.

The second recommendation read: "The Tar River Baptist Association Council recommends we allow the Trustees to have our present office in Justice listed with a realtor with a multiple listing at the appraised value." The recommendation was put in motion by Steve Jones and was seconded by Nan Jones. Discussion followed and the recommendation was unanimously approved.

The Director of Missions gave his report (copy attached).

Moderator Gerald Nelms asked if there were any announcements. Prayer requests followed and Rev. Norris Cook led in prayer and we were adjourned.

## Director of Mission's Report

I'm happy to report that Tar River Baptist Association enjoyed another good year during 1990-91. It is a joy to serve this association as its Director of Missions. I am pleased with the progress we have made during the five years I have served as Director of Missions, and I am excited about our future. With cooperation, prayer support, and financial backing of our member churches there is no limit to what we can accomplish as we do missions together.

Highlights of the year include: (1) an excellent Royal Ambassador Banquet last November, (2) the beginning of new work with Hispanics at Strickland's Crossroads, (3) another good basketball season climaxed by a well-attended Sports Awards Banquet, (4) an informative and inspiring Semi-Annual Meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association, and a vote by the Associational Board to clear the property in Louisburg to prepare for building, and to authorize a multiple listing of the property in Justice.

Mission ministries continue with strength at the following places: (1) Bunn Prison (Bible Study one night each week, and a service each Sunday), (2) Lake Royale (an early Sunday morning service throughout the year, (3) Louisburg Manor (an 11:00 a.m. service each Friday), (4) Sandy Creek Baptist Church and the Hispanic Church at Strickland's Crossroads (Bible studies and worship services each Sunday afternoon from 3:00 till 5:00 o'clock). In addition, the association with which we are in partnership in Brazil would like us to send teams to do evangelism and construction during 1992. There is a place for everyone to be involved in mission ministry.

It is my prayer that we will move with a degree of dispatch on the construction of the new Associational Center. I sound this word of caution: we must not incur debt that must be paid with "program money." We need the money our churches are currently giving to provide programs, training, and activities that will strengthen our churches at the local level. At this point our churches need to realize that whether or not they are strengthened depends upon their participation in what the association offers.

There is really no need to incur debt that would have to be paid with "program money." If each of our churches would find five to six people (or families) that would give \$1,000.00 over the next five years, we could easily build the new facility. Some churches and individual members have already responded to this challenge. I encourage others to do so. We need to hear from contributors immediately so we will know what to count on. Let's build this new Associational Center TOGETHER to the glory of God.

I must confess that I have had some disappointments throughout the year. I have been disappointed that more churches and church members have not participated in the quarterly meetings of the Associational Board. I pray that there will be greater participation during the new year. I have also been disappointed that some fellowship opportunities for pastors, staff, and spouses had to be cancelled because of lack of interest or participation. I sense a genuine need for more fellowship opportunities for pastors, staff, and spouses. I was also disappointed that the Sunday School Enlargement and Improvement Revival had to be postponed. We need to do something to strengthen Sunday School work in the association. I also regret that we were unable to have a banquet expressing appreciation to all volunteers within the Tar River Baptist Association. Please know that I haven't given up on these things. I will keep on trying, praying, and working to the glory of God.

This team of volunteers has spent time in training and equipping sessions to enable them to give assistance to the churches. Please call on your ASSISTeam. They will be delighted to help.

A Sunday School Enlargement and Improvement Revival had been scheduled for October 1991. We had to cancel because so few churches voted to participate. It was our conclusion that perhaps the timing was not right for this emphasis. So, we are planning to reschedule it sometime during 1992. Keep watching for more information about this effort and plan to be involved. We really do need to enlarge and improve our Sunday Schools.

Sunday School work within the association has centered around three major events during the past year: (1) Two VBS Clinics were conducted. One was our Early bird Clinic for pastors and directors only, and the other was our training clinic for all VBS workers. The Earlybird Clinic was hosted by the Pilot Baptist Church and the regular training clinic was hosted by the Spring Hope Baptist Church. (2) The Key Leadership Conference, conducted at the Flat Rock Baptist Church, featured a general overview of new Sunday School methods and materials. (3) The Associational Sunday School Night, hosted by the Pine Ridge Baptist Church, was given to an age-graded curriculum study of new literature.

Let's make 1991-92 our best year ever in Sunday School work. Mr. Gerald Nelms, layman of the Sandy Creek Baptist Church, has agreed to serve as Associational Sunday School Director for the new year. He assumes this responsibility with a great deal of interest and enthusiasm. He has proven his leadership as Moderator and as a member of the Associational Council. ## **Discipleship Training Report**

I learned some startling statistics this past year from our State Convention Discipleship Training leaders. . .

“Although 62 percent of the people in the United States today claim to be religious only 25 percent claim to be Christians and only 19 percent of these know what being a Christian really means.

What this is telling us is that the average Christian today cannot even share what being a Christian means to them. The reason is that, although they have been baptized in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, they are not being taught “to obey everything” Jesus has commanded us to obey. (Mt. 28:19-20)

What we are seeing is a very dangerous trend. The cults and those teaching the silly and deceptive myths of this world are finding it easy to steal away our sheep. They are seeing that the average Christian cannot discern between the truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the false teachings that Jesus said would be commonplace in these last days.

Another trend we are seeing is the immoral behavior of our church members because they do not realize what they are doing is sin. They do not realize this because they are not schooled in the Word of God which clearly instructs us in this area. Divorce is as common in the Christian home as in the secular and many of our church members are living defeated lives simply because they do not know any better.

What must WE do to remedy these situations? We must raise the awareness level of all of our church members to these realities. We also need to help every pastor, church staff member, church council member and deacon to realize the urgent need for Discipleship training for every age group in our churches.

Next we need to educate ourselves as to the wide range of very helpful resources available to us through Southern Baptist Discipleship Training materials.

We need to budget adequately and early and plan our specific efforts for our individual churches for meeting our specific Discipleship Training needs. We also need to aggressively recruit God-called and gifted teachers to sacrificially give of themselves to see to it “that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the KNOWLEDGE of the Son of God. . .” (Eph. 4:12-13)

We need to realize the absolutely essential nature of Discipleship Training as well as realizing that we are entrusted with the responsibility of seeing to it that our church is actively developing a Discipleship Training program that will meet the needs of our people.



This task begins with the PASTOR TEACHER and is ultimately his responsibility. (Eph. 4:11-12) But, pastors need the support and encouragement of church members and deacons as well.

Let us renew our commitment this year to take an aggressive approach to developing Discipleship Training in our individual churches as well as in our Association.

Your Associational Discipleship Training Council is available to assist you in this effort. There are many materials and approaches to choose from. Please call on any member of the council for consultation as your needs arise. Please pray for our Lord's leadership for yourselves in this matter and for your association as we seek to work with you in developing this most important area of ministry.

## **Woman's Missionary Union Report**

The work of WMU in Tar River is conducted by approximately 1,445 members in 139 organizations of Mission Friends, Girls In Action, Acteens, Baptist Young Women, and Baptist Women. We experienced some growth this year in our number of organizations and members, but we hope you will make this a priority to help us grow even more in 1991-92. We had seven of our churches who were Distinguished organizations last year and we are very proud of these organizations. This takes a lot of hard work and dedication and we hope more of our churches will work toward accomplishing all their mission goals through Woman's Missionary Union.

The purpose of all age-level organizations is to study missions, engage in mission action and personal witnessing, and to support missions through prayer and giving.

Tar River WMU is governed by a Council of ten women, each state trained to represent all age levels of WMU as well as Mission Action and Enlistment Enlargement. These associational leaders in turn train their counterparts in the local church. Donice Harrod led the training team from North Carolina to Sao Paulo, Brazil in November. Many of our WMU organizations in Tar River helped to support Nan and Linda with this trip to Brazil since it was a special WMU assignment.

Each year our Annual Spring Meeting is a highlight of our year and we hope that you will encourage all your WMU members, especially your youth groups to attend this meeting. Our Annual Spring Meeting in 1992 will be held at Pilot Baptist Church on April 13.

This year we are proud to announce that Miss Tera Jones from the Pilot Baptist Church was on the State Acteens Advisory Board and represented us well as an Acteens Activator. The past two summers she has participated in a summer mission trip for our state. We hope you will invite her to share what this experience has meant

to her and hopefully encourage your Acteen age girls to become more involved in missions through Acteens. Tera is the first Acteen in Tar River to accomplish this honor and we are very proud of her.

Plans are complete for our Prayer Retreat in Tar River scheduled for November 3, 1991 at Duke Memorial Baptist Church. This is open to everyone and is being sponsored by our Baptist Women/Baptist Young Women. Please help us to promote this event and encourage as many as possible to attend.

Our Tar River WMU Council exists to assist our churches. Please call on us anytime and give us the privilege of working with you to multiply mission work in our association through WMU. If you do not have WMU in your church we hope you will let us help you get involved in this coming year.

In the Junior League the Flat Rock Baptist Church team won the championship while the Social Plains Baptist and the Franklinton Baptist Church teams tied for runners-up. In Senior-League Tournament play the Pilot Baptist Church team emerged as champions with the Flat Rock Baptist Church team finishing second. Tournament champions in the Junior League was the team from the Social Plains Baptist Church and runners-up was the team from the Flat Rock Baptist Church.

The Senior Team from the Pilot Baptist Church advanced to state competition. We congratulate them for winning the High School Baptist Young Men's State Basketball Championship.

## **Historian's Report**

### **Outstanding Achievements 1991-1992**

**BAILEY:** Rev. Jack Watson was ordained into the Gospel Ministry. A dishwasher was added to the pastorium and the stove, refrigerator and counter tops were replaced also. A Baby Dedication Service was held. We hired a new choir director. We started two new Sunday School classes and we painted and carpeted one classroom. ## Christian Action League of North Carolina, Inc. Annual Report

This has been a most eventful year for the cause of Applied Christianity.

With North Carolina facing a 1.1 billion dollar shortfall and with news accounts stating that citizens from North Carolina are spending 100 million dollars annually in the Virginia lottery, it appeared almost inevitable that a lottery bill would pass the 1991 legislative session.

In addition to the economic factors, the gambling industry had 13 lobbyists working the halls of the Legislature daily promoting lottery legislation.

Even though lottery legislation passed the Senate, it was quite evident that the lottery lobbyists could not line up enough votes to get the measure through the House of Representatives. Lottery supporters did not push for a vote, for they knew that the legislation would be dead. Therefore, the proposal will be eligible to be considered in the next legislative session when it convenes in June, 1992.

Between now and then, it is most important that you secure a commitment from your representatives in the North Carolina House to oppose state-sponsored gambling. The Senate will not be voting on the lottery in 1992 because it has already passed that body.

Key lottery supporters were Senator Ken Royall (D-Durham), Senator George Daniels (D-Caswell), Representative David Redwine (D-Brunswick), Representative Joe Mavretic (D-Edgecombe), Representative Robert Hunter (D-McDowell) and Representative Frank Rhodes (R-Forsyth).

Opponents of the legislation were led by Governor Jim Martin, Lieutenant Governor Jim Gardner, Senate President Pro-Tem Henson Barnes (D-Wayne), and Speaker of the House Dan Blue (D-Wake).

While we were successful in side-tracking lottery legislation, the Legislature refused to enact the following proposals:

1. **PARENTAL CONSENT:** North Carolina remains one of the few states in the nation that allows a minor to receive an abortion without parental consent. Legislation to enact parental consent passed the House, but died in the Senate.
2. **DRUNK DRIVING:** The House passed legislation that would change the alcohol blood level from .1 to .08 as the breathalyzer standard for Driving-While-Impaired. The Senate refused to act on this proposal.
3. **OPEN CONTAINERS OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IN MOTOR VEHICLES:** It is ironic that an open *liquor* bottle is prohibited in a motor vehicle, yet there is no limit to the number of open beer containers allowed in a motor vehicle. Highway safety authorities confirm that a large majority of the drivers charged with driving-while-impaired are beer drinkers. N.C. Highway Patrol officials endorsed the open container legislation, but it got "hung up" in a House committee.
4. **TEEN AGE PREGNANCIES:** In order to address this growing problem, legislation was introduced to require sexual abstinence instruction to be a part of the curriculum of our public schools. (Such instruction has been very successful in reducing teen-age pregnancies in other areas of our country.) However such a program was opposed by our N.C. Department of Public Instruction. Education officials charged that such legislation would be imposing a standard of morality upon our youth. The measure simply stated: "The State Board of Education shall adopt rules to provide that public school curriculum shall include instruction, in appropriate grades and classes, that abstinence from sexual activity out-

side of marriage is the expected standard for all school age children, that abstinence from sexual activity is the only certain means of avoiding out-of-wedlock pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, including AIDS, and other associated health problems; and that a mutually faithful monogamous relationship in the context of marriage is the best lifelong means of avoiding sexually transmitted diseases, including AIDS.”

5. **ABORTION FUND:** North Carolina is the only Southeastern state that used state tax funds for medically unnecessary abortions. Some \$400,000 of state tax funds have been budgeted by the state legislature to pay for these elective abortions. Therefore, we are denying thousands of babies *life*, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

How can we turn the tide on these important moral issues? It will occur when North Carolina Baptists and other Christians are willing to become actively and publicly involved in upholding our Judeo-Christian moral standards. It is not enough just to wring our hands and just talk about the problems. We need to cry out publicly and act against sin. Baptists need to be informed about the stands taken on these issues by those who are running for public office, and then VOTE for those who reflect our standards.

In addition to a demanding legislative session, the Christian Action League has successfully assisted several counties and municipalities in liquor, beer, and wine referendums.

Good Government Seminars were conducted in the Asheville and Wilmington areas, at which some of the above issues were addressed. Nationally recognized authorities came to share their expertise on the issues of gambling and family matters. These included Dr. Paul Cameron, Chairman of the Family Research Institute, Washington, D.C.; Austin McGuigan, former State's Attorney for Connecticut; and Bill Swindell, National Field Director, American Family Association, Tupelo, Mississippi.

We praise God for your prayer and financial support as we join in addressing moral and ethical issues facing our society.

## North Carolina Baptist Foundation

The Board of Directors and the staff of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation are committed to effective leadership in generating increased perpetual financial support of Baptist causes throughout the state, nation and world. With assets approximately \$27 million (market value) at the end of the 1990 fiscal year, the income distribution to Baptist causes is significant each year.

Typically, assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes, or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income being paid to Baptist causes in perpetuity.

Earned income distributed to Baptist institutions and mission causes during fiscal year of 1990:	\$647,180
Earned income distributed to individuals with Baptist causes named as charitable remainderman during fiscal year of 1990:	\$686,124

The staff of the Foundation consists of seven full time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. The servicing of individual accounts requires continuous contact with trustors, donors and those designating gifts through Wills. The increased number of requests for assistance in seminars and conferences by churches, associations and individuals has made part-time assistance necessary in regions of the state some distance from the office.

There are continual improvements being made in available charitable estate planning computer software, constant changes in state and federal regulations which affect charitable estate planning and an increased need for technical training and assistance to serve the ever increasing needs of both the development staffs of our institutions and the individuals utilizing the Foundation services. The Foundation continues to provide for these needs to maximize the growth in financial support for Baptist causes.

In 1990, the Foundation moved into a new home. The 6,000 square foot office building was constructed from gifts from individuals and is located on property provided by the Baptist State Convention next to the Baptist Building in Cary. The new facility was occupied in February 1990 and provides much needed space for the work of staff as well as for conferences and meetings. Baptist groups are invited to use the meeting rooms when in the Raleigh/Cary area. We extend an invitation to church groups to call and arrange a visit to the newest building used for the Lord's service by North Carolina Baptists.

## **Baptist College Report — 1991**

A "new-old" event is about to take place in North Carolina Baptist life: *A Special Committee!*

From time to time we Baptists feel the need to take a hard look at ourselves. We do that through the time-honored practice of asking trusted people to serve on a committee for a year, sometimes two. In 1956, for example, "The Committee of Twenty-Five" began a comprehensive study which eventually embraced all aspects of North Carolina Baptist life. That committee reported to a special session of the Baptist State Convention called for that purpose on May 5-6, 1959. Again, "The Committee of Twenty," appointed in 1967, worked for two years before presenting its comprehensive findings and recommendations to the Convention in November of 1969. Both of these committees provided clarity and guidance for North Carolina Baptists which endured for many years.

New times call for a fresh look at ourselves. The "new times" which have taken shape in the Southern Baptist Convention since 1979 have particular relevance for institutions, agencies, their trustees and the Convention. North Carolina Baptist institutions and agencies have rendered distinguished Christian service for a total of 1,108 years! New times call for a new look by a competent special committee.

In May the General Board approved a 17-member "Institutions Relations Committee." Lamar Brooks, Wilmington, is chairman. Other members are: Jean P. Abernethy, Marian; Dot Allred, Gastonia; Curtis Lee Barbery, Bennett; Harold Ben-



nett, Boone; Don Bolden, Burlington; Caralie Brown, Raleigh; Kathryn H. Hamrick, Shelby; John H. Hewett, Asheville; Milton A. Hollifield, Jr., Stanley; John M. Hough, Jr., Salisbury; James H. Johnson, Candler; Robert B. Poole, Elizabeth City; George W. Pullium, Jr., Knightdale; Hobart Smith, Charlotte; A. Eugene Warren, Charlotte; J.L. Wilson, Winston-Salem. Their report is due in November, 1992.

### **Annuity Board Report**

Protection is an instinct each adult has toward his spouse and children.

It hurts to see a child fall or a spouse passed over for a promotion. We want to shield loved ones from the hurts of everyday life.

- up to \$67,500 in special survivor benefits if you die prior to retirement, or while receiving a disability benefit.
- up to \$300 a month if you become disabled and unable to perform any gainful employment due to physical or mental incapacity.

Additionally, up to \$35 each month can be credited to your retirement income account during your disability and your survivor benefits will remain.

This valuable family protection is funded from Cooperative Program dollars that match dollars contributed to your account by you and your church.

"The Church Annuity Plan offers significant up-front family protection that leaves your dollars free to build your retirement security. It is an important benefit that many ministers overlook in the retirement plan," Frank Schwall, senior vice president of Member Services.

The average annuitant in North Carolina receives \$287.43 per month, up from \$234 last year.

North Carolina has 3,396 members making contributions to Annuity Board retirement plans.

It is exciting to think about what has been done to help ministers retire with dignity and to have protection as they plan for retirement. Strong efforts have been made to make all of our churches (and ministers) aware of the opportunities and the need to act on them.

But there is still much to be done! Consider these facts:

- small contributions make the annuitant's benefits small:

185 receive less than \$50

482 receive less than \$100

1,041 receive less than \$200

1,338 receive less than \$300

There is a GREAT challenge still before us to help ministers prepare for the future and to help churches be responsible employers.

## **Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc.**

1991: Making Life for Older Adults the Best of Times

The Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. operates four residential facilities for Older Adults around the State — Albemarle Baptist Home in the Southern Piedmont, the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville, the Hamilton Baptist Home in Eastern North Carolina, and the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem.

In Asheville, 1991 began with a great deal of excitement. After more than five years of trying to receive state approval to build a nursing care bed addition, the Baptist Retirement Homes was awarded a Certificate of Need for 100 medicaid certified nursing care beds for its Western North Carolina Baptist Home on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. Currently the only nursing care provided by the Baptist Retirement Homes is the 85 bed nursing care unit at the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem. The addition of 100 medicaid certified beds will mean that quality nursing care can be offered to Western North Carolina Baptists regardless of their ability to pay for the institutional services that they need.

The 39,000 square foot addition will cost approximately \$2.8 million. At the present time, the Baptist Retirement Homes has raised approximately \$2 million of the \$2.8 million needed to make this long hoped for dream a reality. Baptists across Western North Carolina are being urged to help Baptist Retirement Homes meet the financial challenge of building this new unit on Richmond Hill.

In Winston-Salem, the Brookridge Retirement Community completed its second year of operation. Under the leadership of a well-trained and committed Christian staff, the Brookridge Retirement Community's Independent Living area and Health Care Unit are considered among the finest in the state.

In Albemarle and Hamilton, Assisted Living care is provided to Older Adults in residential settings. The Albemarle and Hamilton facilities offer quality care to Older Adults regardless of their ability to pay for the cost of the care they receive. . . a service unmatched by any other church related long-term care institution in this state.

## BCH Gives Children a Chance!

For an institution that's 106 years old, Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina (BCH) looks strongly to the future!

Three pillars that uphold that futuristic foundation are: 1) The return of the Thanksgiving Offering beginning in November 1991; 2) The success of our "Give a child a chance!" financial campaign, and 3) Baptists' continued support of BCH through the Cooperative Program.

This financial undergirding made it possible for BCH to serve more than 1,200 children and families last year through facilities at 13 locations across the state. Because Baptists cared enough to give, residents like Lynn will go to Wingate College this fall; Chris graduated from UNC-Chapel Hill; Jennifer is in her second year at Haywood Community College and Mark earned a football scholarship to North Carolina A & T. Each of these lives proceeds on firm footing because Baptist Children's Homes was there to pave their pathway.

Most BCH residents come from dysfunctional families where a single parent, most often a mother, simply is unable to care for her children. Her frustration with life leads to limitless freedom for the children, which leads to troubling behavior. Physical abuse, divorce, alcohol, drugs and truancy mark their young lives.

Baptist Children's Homes provides a safe environment where children learn to name their problems and address them to change behavior. At the same time, willing family members also are addressing their problems with the help of BCH social workers. In many cases, children and families are restored.

BCH's "Give a child a chance!" campaign is raising \$11 million over three years to expand Cameron Boys Camp, boost general operating income and increase endowment. Gifts and pledges through July totaled \$9.3 million and response across the state has been overwhelming and heart gratifying.

Last year Baptist Men of North Carolina helped construct the new Tommy and Jeanie Eller Chuckwagon at Cameron Boys Camp that was dedicated May 19.

BCH celebrated this spring the 20th anniversary of the founding of Broyhill Home, our western-most campus, in Waynesville/Clyde. With the help of J.E. Broyhill and his family, the home was opened in 1971 on 91 hilly acres. It has capacity for 48 children in group care and for eight girls in emergency care.

In August 1990 BCH began the Gregg Children's Center for before and after school care. The Davidson County program offers security to children of working couples, who now don't have to go home to empty houses.

Children's hopes the world over have been bolstered by the 1991 return of the Thanksgiving Offering voted by messengers to the 1989 state convention. While suffering through its 13-year absence, BCH lost more than \$2 million in potential gifts. Our goal this year is \$500,000. Because of a partnership established in December with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil, *BCH-North Carolina will donate 10 percent of everything it receives over the \$500,000 goal for work in that desperately needy land.*

In August 1990, BCH signed an agreement with Gaston County Department of Social Services to operate two emergency care homes owned by the county. That raises to seven the number of emergency care homes BCH operates. Emergency care, in which a child at risk of abuse or neglect can receive shelter right away, is the service most in demand throughout the state. Children stay a maximum of 60 days while BCH works with the custodian to determine a long-term plan of care.

The Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning from the churches. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our North Carolina churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. This is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

Baptist Children's Homes has a 106-year history. But its history is just the knot that ties it to a boundless, unbroken ribbon of promise that stretches beyond the future to wrap children and families with eternal blessings.

# Constitution

## ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

## ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

## ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches, and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet bi-annually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session.

## ARTICLE IV - RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator and the Director of Missions shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

## ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; to send messengers to the Association Sessions; to give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter; these are to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the fall meeting of the Association.

## ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

#### ARTICLE VII - STAFF

The staff of the Association shall be a Director of Missions and a Secretary. Other staff members may be added by vote of the Association in annual or called session, or by the Associational Executive Board if said positions can be justified and funded.

#### ARTICLE VII - DUTIES OF THE STAFF

A. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to lead the Association to fulfill its mission faithfully effectively, and lovingly. His role is three-dimensional: (1) mission strategist, (2) minister to the churches, pastors, and other church staff members, and (3) general leader of the Association. Within the limits of his time and ability, he is to respond to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Association.

B. It shall be the duty of the Associational Secretary to provide administrative support services to the Director of Missions and to the Tar River Baptist Association.

#### ARTICLE IX - OFFICERS

A. The officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Trustees.

#### ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to plan for and preside over the annual and called meetings of the Association-In-Session and the Associational Executive Board, and to encourage fellowship and mutual care among the churches. He shall open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. The Moderator shall appoint a Parliamentarian to serve at each Session of the Association and the Associational Executive Board Meetings. He shall also serve as ex officio chairman of the Associational Executive Board. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to assist in developing fellowship and mutual care among the churches and church leaders. He shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in the Moderator's absence, serve as vice-chairman of the Associational Executive Board, and serve as Chairman of the Associational Council.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the Association-In-Session and of the Associational Executive Board, and to make this information available on request. The Clerk shall use all diligence to have the record of transactions printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible and to mail the church clerks reminders about, and forms for, the annual church letter. The Clerk shall also serve as ex officio Secretary of the Associational Executive Board.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to assist in receiving, accounting, and disbursing of all the Association's monies as authorized by the Association or the Associational

Executive Board. By virtue of his office the Treasurer shall be an ex officio member of the Finance Committee.

E. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to act as the legal agents of the Association and shall hold title of all property of the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive title to real and personal property, and to sell and convey or mortgage same upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association. They are also responsible for keeping an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association, a copy of which is to be kept on file in the Associational Office. The Trustees are to be three in number, and they are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

## ARTICLE XI - COMMITTEES

The Committees of the Association are administrative in nature. These administrative Committees are as follows: Nominating; Credentials; Finance; Resolutions; Time, Place, and Preacher; Program; Constitution; Christian Education; Strategy; Properties; History; and others deemed necessary or desirable. Each Committee shall be under the supervision of the Associational Executive Board. Committee members shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new Committee will take office. Members are allowed to serve more than one term in succession.

## ARTICLE XII - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

A. The **NOMINATING COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to nominate all associational officers, leaders, committeemen and council representatives with the exception of associational staff members. This committee is to be appointed by the Moderator of the Association, and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. The **CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Association in determining when churches are of like faith and order, and when they can be properly accepted in the fellowship of the Association. It is also the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association as voting members of the Association.

C. The **FINANCE COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the association in securing, administering, and reporting its finances. This committee will plan and propose an annual budget to the Associational Executive Board and suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. This committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. They shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as an ex officio member of this committee.

D. The **RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to assist the Association in studying resolutions for adoption by the Association or the Associational Executive Board. This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting, Officers of the Association, Host Churches, and other matters.

E. The TIME, PLACE, and PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational Meeting.

F. The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association and the host pastors of the Annual Meeting. It shall be their duty to assist the Association in planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Association. They shall receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form for the sessions of the Association which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business.

G. The CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes. This Committee shall receive all proposed changes and/or amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Tar River Baptist Association, and upon study of said changes and/or amendments make recommendations to the Association concerning said changes and/or amendments.

H. The CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to keep before the churches of the Association all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

I. The STRATEGY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Association in determining strategic objectives and staying on course in achieving them.

J. The PROPERTIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Association in properties administration. This Committee shall develop and recommend policies and procedures for using associational facilities and equipment.

K. The HISTORY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Association's life and work.

### ARTICLE XIII - INSTITUTIONAL AND AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES

The Institutional and Agency Representatives of the Convention shall include the following: Annuity Board, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes, Christian Higher Education, Religious Literature, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Missions. The representatives for these institutions and agencies shall be responsible for providing information to the churches during the year, and/or giving reports on the work of the institutions and agencies at the Annual Meeting of the Association.

### ARTICLE XIV - MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

The Mission Performance Councils shall undergird and give support to the work of program related ministries of the Association. Training leadership shall be a primary responsibility of these Councils. All Mission Performance Councils shall be under the supervision of the Associational Executive Board. These Mission Performance Councils are as follows: Seminary Extension, Ordination Advisory, Music Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Vacation Bible School, Recreation, Media Library, Pastoral Ministries, Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions Development, Youth Ministry, and Family Ministry.



## ARTICLE XV - DUTIES OF THE MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

A. The SEMINARY EXTENSION COUNCIL shall direct any Seminary Extension Program for the churches affiliated with the Association. This Council shall be composed of at least (5) members.

B. The ORDINATION ADVISORY COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to act only in an advisory capacity for churches seeking assistance in examining prospective candidates approved for ordination. This Council shall conduct its work within the guidelines of the Association.

C. The MUSIC COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. This Council shall plan and implement the music program of the Association. They shall recommend to the Program Committee the music for the Annual Meeting, and they shall enlist accompanists for all Associational Meetings.

D. The SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of the ASSISTeam to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate Associational Sunday School Work.

E. The DISCIPLESHIP TRAINING COUNCIL shall be composed of age level leaders (Preschool, Children, Youth, Adult) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the total Associational Discipleship Training Program.

F. The WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION COUNCIL shall consist of the leadership recommended by the WMU Nominating Committee and elected by the Associational WMU. This Council will have the responsibility of planning, promoting, conducting, and evaluating Associational WMU work.

G. The BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL shall be composed of the officers of the Associational Brotherhood. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, and evaluate the work of Associational Baptist Men and also the work of Associational Royal Ambassadors.

H. The VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. The Vacation Bible School Council Director is the leader of the VBS team and shall plan and promote the Associational VBS Clinic. The team of age-group VBS leaders who comprise this team shall be responsible for conducting the Associational VBS Clinic.

I. The RECREATION COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members whose duty it shall be to help plan, coordinate, promote, and conduct the entire recreation program of the Association. They shall be available to assist any Associational entity with the planning and conducting of recreational activities. The work of this Council includes setting up and supervising the Associational Basketball Program, and any other Associational Sports Programs that may be started. This Council will also plan, promote, and conduct the Annual Royal Ambassador Track Meet, and the Annual Royal Ambassador Car Competition.

J. The MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL shall consist of at least three (3) members. This Associational Church Media Library Organization is often referred to as TACMO. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to provide for the mutual sharing of inspiration and information for furthering the Church Media Center Ministry of the affiliated churches.

K. The PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL shall be composed of the following: (1) Associational Pastoral Ministries Director, (2) Church Administration Services Coordinator, (3) Deacon Ministry Coordinator, (4) Vocational Guidance Coor-

dinator, and (5) Church Weekday Education Coordinator, and any others that may be deemed necessary or advisable. The duties of this Council shall be to determine the pastoral ministries emphasis in the Associational Program and to schedule the events in cooperation with the total programming of the Association. The major task of the Council shall be the development and training of ministries through conferences, workshops, clinics, awareness meetings, retreats, and ministries support groups.

L. The EVANGELISM COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. It shall be the duty of this Council to plan and promote any evangelism programs, training projects, and rallies in the Association. It shall also be the responsibility of this Council to keep evangelism before the pastors and laypeople of the Association.

M. The STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for stewardship development and promotion within or among the churches of the Association. It will be the task of this Council to seek to lead the churches to set specific, attainable, measurable stewardship goals.

N. The MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall consist of at least seven (7) members. This Council shall be responsible for missions development in the total program of the Association. The Council shall not only be concerned with already established missions, mission work, and mission activities; it shall be concerned with beginning new mission work. It will be their responsibility to study the missionary needs of the Association and make recommendations concerning new work. They shall also recommend mission projects or activities with which the churches in the Association may cooperate. They shall strive to get each church in the Association to elect or appoint a Church Missions Development Council.

O. The YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall plan youth related ministries for the Association including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

P. The FAMILY MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for helping to plan, promote, and conduct any program emphasis related to family life. This Council should strive to include the needs of senior adults, single adults, marriage partners, parents, and children.

#### ARTICLE XVI - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

The Associational Council shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, the Directors of the various Program Councils of the Association, and three members at large. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to assist the Director of Missions in planning, coordinating, promoting, and executing the Associational Programs, making recommendations to the Associational Executive Board or to the Association in its Annual Fall Meeting. It shall also be the duty of this Council to plan the Annual Associational Calendar. This council shall meet quarterly on another Monday evening prior to each Associational Executive Board meeting, and at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator.

#### ARTICLE XVII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

A. The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of the Associational officers as set forth in Article IX, Director of Missions, along with key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Board members shall be members of the church they represent. If a church does not have all these leaders, it may appoint a representative for a committee prior to the

regular Annual Fall Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Associational Executive Board shall meet quarterly usually during March, June, September, and December on Monday night following the fourth Sunday of the month unless a conflict necessitates moving the meeting to Monday after the third or fifth Sunday. The Associational Executive Board may meet at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator for the purpose of transacting special or urgent business.

C. Although each church should earnestly strive to get its full contingent of key leaders to attend, there is no quorum requirement for transacting business at a regular or called meeting of the Associational Executive Board.

D. The Director of Missions is an ex officio member of the Executive Board and does not have the power to vote.

E. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as follows:

1. The Executive Board of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary, and to define his duties.

2. To act for the Association between regular session of the body.

3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.

4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.

5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the annual budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.

6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Board in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

## ARTICLE XVIII - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

## ARTICLE XIX - AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and the Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Association meeting, also said amendment(s) will be presented to the afternoon session and voted on no earlier than the evening session.

## ARTICLE XX - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order*.

## ARTICLE XXI - BUSINESS PROCEDURE

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with a prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator, and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. Any resolution to be presented to the Associational Executive Board and/or Annual Associational meetings must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Association and published in the Associational newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.

10. Reports of committees on Convention matters must be brief - that on missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to: Librarian of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina; *Biblical Recorder*, Raleigh, North Carolina; Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina; Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee and State Baptist Convention.

13. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

### AFTERNOON SESSION

(NOTE FROM CLERK: Reports are not printed in the Proceedings. The reports are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

1. The 162nd Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:15 p.m. by Moderator Jimmy Pulliam who is the pastor of the Rock Spring Baptist Church.

2. Rev. Bill Wallace, Director of Missions, led the opening hymn, "Serve the Lord with Gladness."

3. Rev. Stephen Rummage, pastor of Cedar Rock Baptist Church, read Romans 10: 14, 15, & 17, and led in prayer.

4. The Moderator welcomed everyone and recognized Rev. Bill Wallace.

5. Rev. Bill Wallace presented the report from the Program Committee. Motion

was made and seconded that the program be accepted as printed. Motion was carried.

6. The following new people were recognized and welcomed to the Association: Rev. Stephen Rummage, Cedar Rock; Rev. Elmer Joyner, Cypress Chapel; and Georgette Guin, new Associational secretary/clerk.

7. The moderator recognized and expressed appreciation to the host churches.

8. The histories of the host churches were presented by: Becky Dean, Cedar Rock; Elizabeth Tharrington, Hickory Rock; and Emily Dorsey, White Level.

9. The moderator requested that everyone, who had not done so, complete a registration card and turn it in.

10. Rev. Bill Wallace led in singing, "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes."

11. Mrs. Jan Price was recognized for the report on the Baptist Foundation. She stated that the Baptist Foundation was founded in 1920 with a single gift of two thousand dollars. She then presented the video, "NC Baptist Foundation - Touching the Future." The video is available to all churches by calling the Baptist Foundation.

12. Gene Puckett was recognized for the report on the "*Biblical Recorder*." He informed us that the "*Biblical Recorder*" was started in 1833, born to keep Baptist informed, and writes history while it is being made. He then "walked" us through the May 2, edition of the paper. He said that it covers local, national, and international news. He then opened the floor to questions. He had stated that in this thirty-four years as an editor of state papers, the number one issue had been the recent matters concerning decisions made by the Pullen Memorial Baptist Church in Raleigh, and by the Binkley Memorial Baptist Church in Chapel Hill. He was asked what the second most pressing issue had been. He replied that it was the controversy of the Southern Baptist Convention. He was then asked if he had received any correspondence concerning the appointment of Paige Patterson to the SEBTS. He said that it was too soon and he was expecting correspondence starting next week. A final question was for him to comment on the resignation of Keith Parks. He replied that it was the most damaging thing to the Foreign Mission Board and to total denominational unity.

13. Rev. Bill Wallace urged subscribing to the *Biblical Recorder* to keep informed on what is happening in Baptist life.

14. Rev. Bill Wallace then reported on the Annuity Board of the SBC. He stressed the importance of the program and urged churches to provide this for their pastors. He presented the video, "Retirement Planning: A Message for Lay Leaders." A copy of the video was available at the meeting for each church.

15. Special music was presented by Tena Shearin.

16. The moderator stated that the DOM looked hard to find mission needs in our area and emphasized that money was needed to do missions.

17. Rev. Bill Wallace commented that in an effort to inform the people what the TRBA does, the program had been planned to include testimonies from all of our mission ministries. He then reported on the Hispanic ministry at Sandy Creek since the pastor of that ministry was in Guatamala. Rev. Wallace reported that the work was active and in the "off-season" there was an average of eight to twenty-four people attending the Sunday service. These attendees were permanent residents and many had been saved.

18. Eric Thompson, pastor of the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads, was recognized. He reported that yesterday they had their first child dedication service. Last Saturday was their first Youth activity. On May 24, they would have their

first Baptismal service and it would be held at Samaria Baptist Church. He said that the Spanish people liked to pray and a Wednesday night prayer service had been started at their request. He acknowledged that the Spanish people were a dedicated people and sited an example of a mission member that had donated a \$600 sound system to be used in services despite the fact that he had a very low income with a large family consisting of six children. He closed by requesting prayer for the Hispanic vision of outgrowing the mobile unit they now meet in and for additional space that would be needed when that vision was realized.

19. Rev. Wallace commended Eric Thompson for his dedication. He said that Eric was loved by the Hispanics and went beyond the "call of Duty." He invited everyone to attend the Hispanic services, announcing that Sunday School was at 4:00 p.m. and worship at 5:00 p.m.

20. Rev. Wallace commented on the Basketball Program stating that it too was a mission ministry. Christian sportsmanship is taught through the Basketball program. The program also offers fellowship between youth from the different churches that participate. In addition, all games begin and end with prayer. After the tournament there is a sports award banquet complete with an inspirational speaker, a challenge to the sports participants, trophies, and an award for the Best Christian Attitude.

21. Bobby Britt, a former player and present coach of one of Pilot's basketball teams, was recognized. In his testimony, he stated that the basketball program allowed youth to play ball that might not be able to play anywhere else. It was also a way to reach people for Christ. He said that he had joined the team only to play ball. However, in order to be on the team he was required to attend the meetings and to attend church. Since joining the team he has had the opportunity to be a youth missionary to Brazil. In Brazil one of the goals was to let the people know that they had Christian brothers in the United States. He said that at half time during the games, the team members gave testimonies. After the games they had opportunities to talk with the children. He urged churches to participate in the basketball program because he felt it was important to get people involved in church while they are young. If you do you will notice changes in them as they grow older. He sited an example of a team member that had a "bad" reputation when he started in the program, but by the end of the season he was a new person. He ended his testimony by emphasizing that the Basketball program is an important way to reach people.

22. Ryan Aycock, a youth who has played on the Duke Memorial Team for two years, was recognized. He expressed appreciation for being able to be a part of the basketball program because he would not have been able to play basketball anywhere else. He said that the program offers opportunity to have activity with peers, reinforces Christian attitudes, provides a chance to meet others in the association and to pray with them. He concluded his testimony by saying that the Basketball Program brings church people together.

23. Rev. J.C. Aldridge, pastor of Ransdell Chapel Baptist church, reported on the mission ministry at Louisburg Manor. He stated that the TRBA held services at the Manor every Friday, and that each month a different church was responsible. He read from Ecclesiastes 3 and stated that there was a time and a place for everything and we don't know when one of us will have to go to a resthome. He emphasized that when you go to minister to these people that what happens is, they minister to you. He said that the residents of the Manor wait in anticipation for the arrival of the preacher and are very disappointed when no one comes. They love to hear sing-



ing and are starved for the Word.

24. Rev. Wallace led in the hymn, "Our Best."

25. The moderator appointed Rev. Jack Rose, pastor of Oak Grove Baptist Church, as Parliamentarian.

26. Miscellaneous Business:

(A) Rev. Wallace was recognized and presented a resolution concerning the decisions of Pullen Memorial Baptist Church in Raleigh and Binkley Memorial Baptist Church in Chapel Hill. He had been requested to do this by the TRBA Ministers' Conference. A motion was made and seconded to accept the resolution. Herman Jones from Socail Plains Baptist Church stated that the resolution was out of order in that it was not presented to the Resolution Committee two months in advance, and had not been printed in the Associational newsletter prior to the Semi-annual Meeting. Rev. Wallace checked in the Constitution and found Mr. Jones to be correct (see Article XXI Number 7). Therefore, the resolution was not allowed at this time, but it was referred to the Resolutions Committee.

(B) Rev. Jimmy Pulliam, Moderator, explained that he would not be able to stay for the evening session due to a death in his church family. He requested that, since the vice-moderator was not present, Rev. Bill Wallace be appointed to conduct the evening service. The motion was made, seconded, and carried.

27. The following reports were presented: Associational Executive Board by Gerorgette Guin. Trustees by Epp Catlett, New Building Planning Committee by Gerald Nelms, and The Task Force on Funding the New Associational Center by Rev. Bill Wallace (in the absence of Terry Alford).

28. Rev. Wallace stated that since the economy was tight the office had been cutting back, doing without, or using less expensive methods. He reported that on April 30, the office would not be able to pay the remainder of April bills or to make payroll unless funds come from the churches. He emphasized that the bills were monthly and urged churches to send contributions in monthly increments.

29. The moderator opened the floor for questions. There were none.

30. Rev. Wallace led in singing "To the Work."

31. The moderator introduced Rev. Leo Lowery of Red Bud Baptist Church. He then recognized pastors that had been in the TRBA for almost ten years: Rev. Larry Williams, Louisburg; Rev. Clark Rounds, Ephesus; and Rev. Jimmy Pulliam, Rock Spring.

32. Rev. Don Dowless, pastor of Corinth Baptist Church, read Matthew 16: 24-26, and led in prayer.

33. Special music was presented by Rev. Stephen Rummage.

34. Sandra Wood presented special music.

35. The annual sermon was delivered by Rev. Leo Lowery.

36. Rev. Stephen Rummage was recognized to give instructions for the meal.

37. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Rev. Gary Murry, pastor of White Level Baptist Church.

## EVENING SESSION

1. Inspirational music was presented by the Associational Choir.
2. Rev. Bill Wallace, presiding over the evening session, announced that calendars, copies of the book "Building an Evangelistic Church", and the video "Retirement Planning: A Message for Lay Leaders" were available to the churches. He also presented a request from the Foreign Mission Board for RA's to go to Bolivia.
3. Rev. Rick Wade, pastor of Hickory Rock Baptist Church, was recognized. He read Romans 12: 1-2, and led in the opening prayer.
4. Rev. Bill Wallace led in the hymn, "Make Me a Blessing".
5. The Treasurer's Report was presented by Georgette Guin in the absence of Mr. Sam Wood. Rev. Bill Wallace added to the report that funds were needed to make payroll and pay April's bills.
6. Wendy Edwards was recognized. She emphasized the importance of having Children and Youth Bible Drills in the churches. Through Bible Drills, young people learn Scripture in fun and creative ways. The drill offers them an opportunity to share what they learn in a structured and disciplined way. The Children's Bible Drill is for fourth thru sixth graders, and the youth Bible Drill is for seventh thru ninth graders. She reported that this year only one church participated in the Associational Bible Drills, Spring Hope Baptist Church. She encouraged other churches to start drills for their young people and offered to be of assistance.
7. A Bible Drill Demonstration was presented by the Spring Hope Baptist Church.
8. Gilford Bufkin was recognized to give the Credentials Report. He reported that we had twenty-eight of our churches represented, as well as the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads. Registered were eighty-one messengers, eleven alternates, twenty-four pastors, eleven Associational officers, and thirty-five guests for a total of one hundred sixty-two.
9. The following Resolutions Committee Report was given by Rev. DuPre Sanders:

### RESOLUTION 1:

Whereas Cedar Rock First Baptist Church, assisted by White Level Baptist Church and Hickory Rock Baptist Church, has hosted Tar River Baptist Association's Semi-Annual Meeting.

And whereas they have provided graciously of their facility, fellowship, and food;

Be it therefore resolved that we express our appreciation for their hospitality in the way in which we have been received; for the delicious evening meal that was served; and for their tireless efforts on our behalf.

### RESOLUTION 2:

Whereas, our officers and committees have given freely of their time in the service of our Lord;

And whereas, they have served faithfully and with distinction in their respective ministries;

Be it therefore resolved that we commend them for the unselfish use of their time in furthering our Lord's Kingdom work through the ministries of the Tar River Baptist Association.

### RESOLUTION 3:

Whereas Rev. Bill Wallace has served the Tar River Baptist Association faithfully as Director of Missions;

And whereas, he has been a steadying influence on our association during troubled times within our convention;

And whereas, he continues to serve with enthusiasm as he guides the mission work of the Tar River Baptist Association;

Be it therefore resolved that we affirm Rev. Bill Wallace in his ministry and commend him for his service to our association.

10. Motion was made to adopt the resolutions, seconded, and carried.

11. Special music was presented by Robert Williams.

12. Rev. Wallace announced that our meeting would close with testimonies from people involved in our missions ministries both from the giving and the receiving end. He also acknowledged that none of the mission ministries of the TRBA would be possible without the prayers and financial contributions of the member churches.

13. Nanette Warren was recognized to give testimony concerning the Prison Ministry at the Bunn Prison by the churches that volunteer monthly. Miss Warren asked, "Does prison stop crime?" She continued by saying that the government was failing in stopping crime because the root of crime is moral problems. One does not change the problem without changing the heart. Therefore, we need people to go into the prisons to share the Jesus they have in their hearts. Miss Warren spoke from experience because the Lord has allowed her to go into prisons across North Carolina and in Brazil. Her ministry to prisoners all started at the Bunn prison. Miss Warren urged participation in the TRBA Prison Ministry. She said that prisoners need a Christian example, that God can change lives, and that our community must go and take Jesus into the prisons.

14. Dennis Purkerson, a former prisoner from the Bunn prison who had been helped by Christians and is now a member at Ephesus Baptist Church, gave a testimony. He urged people to get involved in the ministry because a lot of times people just give up on the prisoners and they really need someone to care.

15. Miss Warren closed the report on the Prison Ministry with a poem she had received from a prisoner that had been reached through Christian efforts.

16. Donna Pierce, a dedicated worker in the Christmas Toy Store, was recognized to give a testimony about what the Christmas Toy Store Ministry meant to her.

17. Rev. Wallace reported that each year during the two years of the Toy Store Ministry, over 90 families, including over 230 children, had been helped.

18. Julie Atkins, a recipient of the Toy Store Ministry, was recognized to give her testimony.

19. Rev. Wallace reported that services are held each Sunday at 8:30 a.m. at Lake Royale. He thanked Cypress Chapel for their involvement with the ministry since its beginning.

20. Edwardeen Dixon, a regular attender of the Lake Royale worship services, gave her testimony.

21. Ed Maxwell, also a member of the Lake Royale worship services, gave a testimony.

22. The meeting was adjourned with a closing prayer by Ed Maxwell.

## History of Cedar Rock First Baptist Church 1876-1992

In 1876, a few Christian men and women began a series of religious services at the old Cedar Rock Township Courthouse. In 1877, the small assembly erected its first church building on the land which is now the church cemetery across from the present building. Cedar Rock Baptist Church came into the Tar River Baptist Association as a church in that year. That first church building was constructed and financed by J.W. Sledge, J.F. Fulghum, J.H. Sledge, E.S. Green, R.R. Boone, J.M. Stallings, J.A. Coppedge, W.B. Coppedge, A.C. Fisher, R.B. Gilliam, J.J. May, William Inscoe, Woodson Parrish, and others. The first pastor, Rev. G.W. Newell, helped to scatter the pebbles of Christian influence that lives today in the grandchildren of those faithful old soldiers of the cross.

On Sunday Morning, October 29, 1944, the church building burned to ashes. Services were held in Edward Best High School until the old Cedar Rock School building, which had been purchased in 1941, could be made ready for use. The first service in the present church sanctuary, a beautiful facility capable of seating over 250, was held on October 7, 1951. William Stallings chaired the committee that helped make the dream of Cedar Rock First Baptist Church's new sanctuary a reality. In 1971, church members added stained glass memorial windows and a new heating and air conditioning system to the sanctuary. The sanctuary was remodeled in 1989 and, in 1991, a new organ was placed in the church to the glory of the Lord and in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Phil R. Inscoe.

The church's Sunday School began meeting in its new educational building on November 23, 1958. The building contains two kitchens (one in the basement and one upstairs), large assembly rooms upstairs and in the basement, office space for the pastor and Sunday School, a library (organized in 1962), a recently redecorated nursery, three children's classrooms, five classrooms for adults and young people, and a choir room. The mortgage on the educational building was burned during a special ceremony in 1961, with appreciation expressed to T.O. Nelms and those serving on the building committee. The church was re-roofed in 1990.

The brick parsonage that sits beside the church was completed in 1966. In 1989, it was remodeled, the garage converted into a study for the pastor and the kitchen refurbished.

Cedar Rock First Baptist Church plays an important part in the life of its community, providing a center for neighborhood activities and fellowship. The church has, throughout its history, remained committed to the nurture and upbuilding of its members and to the evangelization of the lost in its area. Through its Sunday School program, its music, its worship, and its activities for the young and old alike, Cedar Rock Baptist Church seeks to make an impact on its community for Christ.

## History of Hickory Rock Baptist Church

On August 1, 1915, a meeting was held at Hickory Rock Academy for the purpose of organizing a missionary Baptist church. Rev. George Duke presided over the meeting; Mr. G.B. West acted as clerk; and Rev. J.H. Harper, as reading clerk. Church services were held in the Hickory Rock Academy until a new building could be constructed. Rev. George Duke was called as the first pastor.

In the fall of 1915, a new building was begun. Under the leadership of Mr. W.J. Dennis, Mr. R.D. Williams, Mr. E.H. Gupton, and great cooperation from the seventeen charter members, the building was completed in the spring of 1916.

The charter members were as follows: Mr. & Mrs. W.J. Dennis, Mr. & Mrs. J.H. Joyner, Mr. A.B. Inscoe, Mr. & Mrs. J.R. Inscoe, Mr. R.H. Bobbitt, Mrs. Cora Bobbitt, Mr. J.R. Joyner, Mr. & Mrs. E.H. Gupton, Mr. Asbury Dennis, Mr. Frank Dennis, Miss Mary Dennis, Mr. Jake Dennis, and Mrs. O.B. Ball. The first deacons of the newly founded church were Mr. W.J. Dennis and Mr. J.R. Joyner, Mrs. A.B. Inscoe became the first church clerk.

Many additions and changes have come about during the years as various pastors have led us. Under the leadership of Rev. John Edwards, the church added a new wing for Sunday School rooms. During the next few years and under the leadership of Pastor Jack Roe, the church made plans for renovations and carried out these plans during the time Rev. Wiley Guthrie was pastor. Six Sunday School rooms were added, and the church was bricked. A heating plant was installed, and an organ purchased. Soon afterward, a new piano was added, the sanctuary received a new carpet, and a front porch was built. With Rev. Henry C. Green, Jr., serving as pastor, groundbreaking for a new educational building took place in the fall of 1962. This building became a reality the next year. During the fall of 1966, a new heating and air conditioning plant was installed in the church sanctuary. In 1969 the church built a parsonage, which was first occupied by Rev. Clay Cook and his family. We continued to make progress under the leadership of Rev. Jimmy Harrington. Under the leadership of Rev. Jack Sammons, central air conditioning was installed in both the parsonage and the educational building, and in 1976 the church constructed a fellowship building. With the Rev. Jerry Bryant as pastor, the church started a puppet ministry in 1979. The church presented the pastor and his family a permanent membership to Town and Country Recreation Center through a memorial fund in memory

of Mrs. Lula Smith. New lighting was installed in the church in memory of Mr. Horace Duke in 1980. Rev. Everett L. Rumley, Jr. was called as pastor in 1981. The church cushioned the pews of the sanctuary, covered the floor in the fellowship building, and recovered the roof over the educational building in 1982. The church added a circular paved drive in memory of Mr. Kirby Parrish in 1983. From 1984 to 1990 the church experienced a number of changes under the direction of Pastor Rick Cato and Dr. Don Godfrey. In the late 80's, a steeple and a baptistry were added to the sanctuary facility. The church adopted a two-year growth proposal in 1989 anticipating the future. In June of 1991, Hickory Rock called Rev. Rick Wade as pastor.

God has richly blessed the people and pastors of Hickory Rock through the years. The people have maintained a vital ministry to student pastors, cultivated warm fellowship, and continued to seek Christian growth in terms of quality and quantity.

## **History of White Level Baptist Church**

In the 1890's, the only site of learning in our area was the old, one-teacher "Sally Murphy School House." It was in this school building that the first Sunday School in this area was started. As the Sunday School grew, it was moved to a bush arbor and in the winter the congregation was divided into cottage prayer groups.

In 1897 a three room school was erected near T.H. Dickens' store, and church services began to be held there. Church was officially organized on May 6, 1906. Eleven persons from Red Bud and twelve persons from Sandy Creek moved their membership to become the twenty-three charter members. Rev. John Sledge became the first pastor at an annual salary of \$50.00.

In 1906 the church was received into the Tar River Association.

Mr. T.C. Collins generously gave the two acres of land, on which the present structure stands. On the second Sunday of July 1911, the building was dedicated with the Rev. L.W. Swope presiding. Rev. Sledge suggested the church be called "White Level" because the surrounding land was white, sandy, and level. The name was adopted, and in 1973 the community was officially named White Level by the Franklin County Commissioners.

During World War I, twenty-one men were called into service. All twenty-one returned safely.

A Baptist Women's Missionary Union was organized in 1923. Mrs. Mamie Dickens was elected president and served in that capacity for fifty-five years.

A steeple and bell were also added to the church in 1923.

In 1928 the WMU started a building fund and gave the first \$325.00 to help buy cement to lay the first blocks for our current building.

During World War II, fifty-six men were called into service from our community, three of whom made the supreme sacrifice: Edward Pernel, Clyde Thorne, and Nelson Wood. Rev. L.H. Hollingsworth, the pastor at this time, volunteered for service and served in the Pacific.

In 1949 the Educational Annex was constructed.

In 1956 Mr. Sol West donated a plot of land on which was the parsonage was built. Mr. Douglas Mitchell was called as the first Minister of Music in 1961.

In 1968 William C. Shearin, one of our members, was killed in the Vietnam War.

The Church Library was established in 1969. Mrs. Leona Dickens was elected and served as Librarian for nineteen years. She was followed by Mrs. Jean Johnson who

is currently the librarian.

To minister to the large number of shut-in members, a tape ministry was begun in February of 1972. Deacon James Wood was instrumental for the most part in establishing this ministry which remains a valuable asset to the church.

White Level Baptist Church has ordained two men into the Gospel Ministry: Ollie Jack Murphy in 1929, and John Rausch in 1991. In 1974 Ronnie West was licensed by the church.

In its eighty-six year period, the church has had twenty-two pastors. The current pastor, Rev. Gary W. Murry was called by the church in February 1990, and the Minister of Music and Youth, Mr. Robert Wills, Sr., began serving the church in September 1991.

During the first two years of the 1990's, our church has participated in Lay Renewal and Lay Ministry Evangelism Weekends which led to a spiritual revival. We have established a Children's Church and re-established Royal Ambassadors, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends. We have seen our average Sunday School attendance grow to a ten year high and have made major renovations on our facilities. We continue to lead monthly services at Burnette's Rest Home.

God has richly blessed us. We can join David in saying "that our cup runneth over." To God be the glory — Amen.

### **Director of Missions Report**

I am happy to report another good year in the Tar River Baptist Association. God continues to bless in so many different ways. All of our missions work seems to be thriving. It is a joy to be a part of such a fine association.

At this semi-annual meeting I wanted for you to have the opportunity to hear first-hand about what you and the Lord are accomplishing through the mission ministries of the association. I have asked a number of people to help with this report - people who have been involved. Some of these people have ministered in the name of Tar River Baptist Association. Others have been on the receiving end of our ministries and are here to tell you what a particular ministry has meant to them. I know you will extend a gracious welcome to all who share in this report. I pray you will greet them individually and get to know them. They are beautiful people. I thank God that He has allowed our paths to cross through some facet of the association's missions ministry.

I do want to leave one very special challenge with you. My challenge is that we give priority to building the new Associational Missions and Resource Center during the coming year. It will also provide additional resources that can enable us to be more effective and efficient as we served our Lord, His churches, and the people within the Tar River Baptist Association. With YOUR help we can make the dream of this new building a reality.

DECEMBER 16, 1991:

Moderator for the session was Jimmy Pulliam. Forty-one were present from 15 churches.

WMU council Director Nan Jones reported participation in the Associational Toy Store and in the collection of items for the Women's Correctional Center.

Evangelism Council Director Billy Tharrington announced a Soul Winning Commitment Day in January, a State Evangelism Conference in February, and an Associational Revival in March.

Richard Morgan, Finance Committee Chairman, thanked the churches for their contributions to the association. He reported that the bank balance was low, that the proposed budget had been amended to include salary for Eric Thompson, and that the Home Mission Board would be paying part of Mr. Thompson's salary.

Sam Wood presented the treasurer's report.

Eric Thompson, reporting on the Hispanic Ministry at Strickland's Crossroads, said that twenty-five had received the Lord, three had made rededications and eight had completed a Bible Study Course.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren reported participation in the Thanksgiving choir, the mass choir at the Sate Convention, singing at Tarrytown Mall and at Bunn, the living Christmas Tree at Springhope, caroling, and singing at the Bunn Prison.

Bill Wallace, after giving his Director of Missions report, was presented with words of praise and a gift by Rev. Cecil Aldridge from the Minister's Conference.

MARCH 30, 1992:

Moderator for the session was Jimmy Pulliam. Fifty-one were present from twenty-one churches.

WMU Council Director Nan Jones announced the WMU Annual Spring Meeting to be held at Pilot on April 13, a joint prayer Seminar with the North Roanoke Baptist Association at Nashville Baptist Church on May 17, a campaign started by the WMU in Birmingham called "Company's Coming."

Bill Wallace announced the Age Level Workers' Workshop planned for April 2 at Pilot.

Evangelism Council Director, Billy Tharrington expressed appreciation for support of the Associational Revival and encourages attendance at the Eastern NC Evangelism workshop.

Finance Committee Chairman Richard Morgan reported that there were not enough funds on hand to make the March payroll or to pay the remainder of the March bills.

Bill Wallace suggested that it would be beneficial if the churches sent contributions on a monthly basis because the associational bills are monthly ones.

Music Council Director, Nanette Warren reported that seven churches had participated in the Associational Choir at the Associational Revival. She announced singing engagements in April at the Tarrytown Mall in Rocky Mount, and at the Associational Semi-annual meeting.

Eric Thompson, reporting on the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads said that the average attendance was up, a Wednesday prayer service and a youth group



had been started, the first Baptismal Service would be in May and twenty more had completed a Bible Study Course.

Bill Wallace, after giving his Director of Missions report, reported on the progress of the plans to clear the lot for the New Associational Center and on a proposal for generating funds for the construction of that center.

### **Building Planning Committee**

Work will begin on clearing the property in Louisburg as soon as the Department of Transportation gives us a green light. We had to contact them about a sewer connection. There is no sewer line on Dogwood Lane. The sewer line on Highways 581 and 56 is across the street from our property. It crosses under Highways 581 and 56 just below our property line. The Association has three options concerning sewer hook-up, (1) Connection can be made by tearing up the road and going across Highways 581 and 56, or (2) connection can be made by going down the highway right of way to the point where the sewage line crosses Highways 581 and 56, or (3) connection can be made by going across the property adjacent to our property to the point where the sewage line crosses Highways 581 and 56.

The Department of Transportation may not want to tear up Highways 581 and 56, and they may not allow us to access the sewer line by going down their right of way. If that proves to be the case, we will need to contact Mr. Cliff Benson to see if he will allow us to run our sewer line across his property to connect with the city sewage system. We cannot proceed until we hear something from the Department of Transportation.

Our benefactor, Mr. Cliff Benson, has been most helpful. He initially gave us the Louisburg property, and has been more than willing to help us all along the way. You will be glad to know that he recently gave us an additional fourteen feet of property to enable us to have enough parking to meet city code. That property has already been deeded to us, and our architect has already drawn a plot plan that has been approved by the city of Louisburg.

We are anxious to get started with clearing the lot. It is our belief that when something tangible begins, interest and revenue will be generated. Be assured that the site work will begin as soon as possible.

Be advised also that our architect has been paid for all the work he has done to this point in time. We want to pay as we go. Our Director of Missions keeps reminding us that we must not use program money to pay debt service. We agree with him that this new Associational Missions and Resource Center can and must be built on revenue generated over and above regular budget funds that come in from our churches.

### **Report from Task Force on Funding New Associational Center**

Your Task force has recommended a plan that will enable us to build the new Associational Missions and Resource Center without touching any money currently being contributed by the churches of the association. That plan has already been put into effect by several of our churches. If each church would activate the plan at the local level, we could soon see the dream of that new building become a reality.

The plan approved by your Task Force can be approached from at least two angles. One way would be for each church to find six contributors who would give or pledge to give 1,000.00 over the next four or five years (a total of \$6,000.00 from each member church). There is nothing magical about six contributors. There could be twelve giving or pledging to give \$500.00, or twenty-four giving or pledging to give \$250.00, etc. Another way to approach the matter is for each resident member of each local church to give \$25.00. According to information reported on the 1991 Uniform Church Letters, there are 10,124 resident members of the churches within the Tar River Baptist Association. If each one of these members opted to give \$25.00 to this building program we would receive \$253,100.00. Your Task Force realized that a few may not be able to give anything, and others may choose not to give. We also realize that there are those who are able to give more and \$25.00, and we believe many will.

We want to make a request of each church in the Tar River Baptist Association family of churches. We would like the opportunity to have someone from the association visit your church and make a five to ten minute appeal to your congregation. Since May 17-24 is ASSOCIATIONAL EMPHASIS WEEK, we would like to promote an offering for the new Associational Missions and Resource Center to be received on Sunday, May 31. Our Director of Missions will enlist, train, and schedule a speaker to come to your church on any Sunday morning during the month of May. We assure you that the promotion of this special offering will be done "decently and in order." Each member of your church will be challenged and encouraged to make a gift of \$25.00 to the building fund, or the church will be encouraged to find enough contributors to give \$6,000.00. We are requesting time during a Sunday morning wor-

ship service in an effort to reach the maximum number of people.

The associational representatives who will be responsible for promoting this offering include the Associational Officers, members of the Associational Council, members of the Finance Committee, members of the Stewardship Council, members of the Building Planning Committee, and members of this special Task Force. Each church may choose one of these representatives, or one can be assigned to your church. It is the prayer of our hearts that each church will comply with our request.

We have already voted to build. Our Building Planning Committee has already had an architect to draw preliminary plans. You have instructed this Task Force to map out a plan of financing that will not interfere with, or take money from, regular budget contributions. This plan will work. We only need to work the plan. We've talked about building long enough. Let's get on with it and build that new Missions and Resource Center to the glory of God.

### AFTERNOON SESSION

(Note from Clerk: Reports are not printed in the Proceedings. The reports are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

1. The 162nd Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Moderator Jimmy Pulliam who is the pastor of the Rock Spring Baptist Church.

2. Rev. Bill Wallace, Director of Missions, led the opening hymn, "O Zion Haste."
3. Rev. Jimmy Pulliam welcomed everyone.
4. Rev. J. Carroll Trotter, Interim Pastor for Pearce Baptist Church, welcomed everyone to the church and made announcements.
5. Rev. Trotter read from the book of Ephesians and led in prayer.
6. Rev. Pulliam announced that we would be conducting the sessions according to "*Robert's Rules of Order.*"
7. Dr. C. Ray Pruette made a motion that the printed program be adopted with one change made on page two, that the Christian Higher Education Report be given at 7:25 followed by the Wingate College Choir mini concert. The motion was seconded by Mr. Gerald Nelms, and carried.
8. The following new pastors were recognized and welcomed to the association: Rev. Wendell Stokes, Social Plains; Rev. Bill Haley; Mount Zion; and Rev. Gordon Joyner, Holly Grove.
9. Guest Charles Tanner from the Baptist Children's Homes was recognized and expressed appreciation for support from the churches.
10. Mrs. Kim Collins of Bunn Baptist Church was recognized as the Honor Clerk for the year.
11. The histories of the host churches were presented by Mrs. Diane Ray of Pearce and Mrs. Melba Ray of Hopkins Chapel.
12. Rev. Wallace led in singing "Jesus Saves."
13. The Sunday School Report was given by Mr. Gerald Nelms.
14. Mrs. Jeannie Whitehead gave the Discipleship Training Report for the Associational Discipleship Training Director Mrs. Wendy Edwards. She talked about the Discipleship Fair that had been held on October 8, and reported that Mrs. Edwards had made plans for 1993. She recommended two good books, "Experiencing God: Knowing and Doing the Will of God" and "Step by Step in the New Testament."
15. Mrs. Nan Jones gave the WMU Council report.
16. Rev. Billy Tharrington gave the Evangelism Council report. He emphasized that the next Associational Revival would be held on a Thursday and Friday instead of a Friday and Saturday. He also encouraged attendance at workshops.
17. Miss Nanette Warren gave the Music Council report. She also announced that the Hispanic Choir from The Hispanic Mission at Stricklands' Crossroads is available to perform at Sunday evening services. She explained that the Music School planned for 1993 is for those who know nothing about music, those who know a lot about music, and for those who play instruments. She then explained the four basic groups in music and gave humorous descriptions of each.
18. Rev. Wallace led in singing "Let Others See Jesus in You."
19. Rev. Clark Rounds was appointed as Parliamentarian.
20. The Treasurer's Report was given by Mrs. Georgette Guin.
21. Dr. Pruette presented the proposed 1993 budget from the Associational Executive Board. He went over the proposed budget, explaining each section. He stated that it was a challenging budget but that the challenge could be met if each church increased its giving. He made a motion that the proposed budget for 1993 be adopted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Herman Jones, Social Plains. After a brief period of discussion, a vote was taken and the motion carried.
22. Rev. Wallace pledged to the association that we would live within our income even if we had to cut back to do so. He challenged us to stretch around the world

and not shorten our outreach, emphasizing that together we can do it.

23. Mr. Robert Stewart, Director of Church Programs for BSC, reported on the Sunday School Growth Campaign, scheduled for February 27-March 7, 1993. He encouraged each church to participate. Mr. Stewart announced that Mr. Windy Rich is to be the coordinator for the Campaign. The campaign is designed to do such things as: train workers, discover prospects, set growth goals and improve worker growth and development.

#### 24. Miscellaneous Business:

Rev. Ronnie Snead, pastor of Rocky Cross Baptist Church, requested the association to approve an application for assistance from the Baptist State Convention for Rocky Cross Baptist Church. A motion was made by Rev. James Pulley, Poplar Spring, that the association approve the request for church growth assistance from BSC to enable a better salary package for the pastor at Rocky Cross Baptist Church. The motion was seconded by Rev. Norris Cook, Hopkins Chapel, and carried.

25. A memorial service in honor of our Brothers and Sisters who were called home during the last year, was conducted by Rev. Groce Robinson, pastor of Peachtree Baptist Church. He read from Psalm 90, and Mrs. Jan Walden of Oak Grove Baptist Church presented special music. Rev. Robinson reminded us that those whom we honor now have left to us the responsibility of carrying on the work.

26. Dr. John R. Woodard, Director of the North Carolina Baptist Historical Collection, reported on the work of this agency. He asked, "Where are your churches' records?" Records of church and association are foundation stones. The agency has three fulltime workers and they collect anything of and about NC Baptist related to churches, institutions, etc. The agency can microfilm your records at no cost. He suggested that churches do an update every ten years. The agency conducts church history workshops by invitation and on an associational basis. The resources of the agency are available to the churches and they will assist church history committees.

27. Special music was presented by Mrs. Jan Walden, Music Director of Oak Grove Baptist Church.

28. The annual sermon was delivered by Rev. Roy E. Snell, retired missionary to Guam, Indonesia, and Korea.

29. Rev. Pulliam expressed thanks to Pearce and Hopkins Chapel Baptist Churches.

30. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Rev. Norris Cook, Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church.

### EVENING SESSION

1. Rev. Jimmy Pulliam called the evening session to order at 7:15 p.m.

2. Rev. Bill Wallace led the opening hymn, "We've a Story to Tell."

3. Rev. Pulliam read scripture from the book of Mark and led in prayer.

4. Dr. Jerry McGee, President of Wingate College, gave the report on Christian Higher Education.

5. A mini concert was presented by the Wingate College Choir.

6. Rev. Wallace gave his Director of Missions' Report.

7. Rev. Wallace made an appeal to the churches to help with the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads. The modular unit that was needed had been purchased with contributions given by the churches and with Baptist State Convention money. The Convention will set up the modular unit, but help is needed to build a handicap ramp. When the first modular unit was set up Peachtree Baptist Church

built the handicap ramp. Now we need contributions to buy the lumber and people to do the labor.

8. Rev. Wallace reported on the Christmas Toy Store Ministry and said that this year there would be two stores, one in Louisburg and one in Spring Hope.

9. A motion was made by Rev. Norris Cook, Hopkins Chapel, to accept the proposed 1993 calendar of events. The motion was seconded by Mr. Gerald Nelms, Sandy Creek, and carried.

10. Rev. Wallace shared the essentials in meeting the challenge of the future. He said that there must be honest feedback from the members and that good marketing was needed. He suggested that events be publicized in each church to promote involvement.

11. Rev. Wallace led in singing "Send the Light."

12. Rev. George Fox led in prayer.

13. Special music was presented by Mrs. Cindy Champion from Pearce Baptist Church.

14. C.H. and Patricia Frazier presented a monologue of Miss Lottie Moon.

15. Rev. Gary McNair made a motion to accept the report. The motion was seconded by Mr. Epp Catlett, and carried.

16. Mrs. Jeanette Ayscue presented the Nominating Committee Report and made a motion that it be adopted. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Elaine Lewis and carried.

17. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, reporting for the Credentials Committee, said that attendance at the Fall Annual meeting was as follows: thirty-six churches and one mission was represented by 112 messengers, 8 alternate messengers, 28 pastors, nine officers, and 55 guests; totaling 212 people

18. The Resolutions Committee Report was given by Rev. Wallace for Rev. DuPre Sanders as follows:

Whereas, Pearce Baptist Church has provided her facilities for the use of the 1992 Fall Session of the Tar River Baptist Association assisted by Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church, and;

Whereas, the Associational officers, program committee, and other committee members have prepared an interesting and informative program:

Be it therefore resolved that we express our deep appreciation to the pastors and members of the host churches, as well as to all others who contributed to the success of this meeting, for their generous contributions of time, talent, and resources.

A motion to accept the resolution was made by Dr. Pruette, seconded by Mr. Bufkin, and carried.

19. The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Clark Rounds.

## **The History of Pearce Baptist Church**

Following a revival meeting held at the old Pearce schoolhouse in the spring of 1915, the Pearce Aminy Baptist Church was organized.

W.D. Harrington and C.T. Plyborn conducted this meeting and led in the organization of the church on April 25, 1915. Thirty-nine members signed the covenant. However, the records show that sixty-nine members transferred their membership from other churches, principally from Poplar Spring. These are referred to as charter members.

It is not clear exactly when the church building was started, but according to Mr. S.G. Phillips, the work began in 1917, and was completed in 1918, at the approximate cost of \$800.00 to \$1,000.00. Most of the material and labor was donated. In November the name Aminy was dropped and the present name was adopted.

A storm nearly tore the church off the foundation in 1936, and plans were laid to erect a new building. Work began in January 1938 and was completed in 1939. The present church interior was completed in 1949. During 1952 the church added a balcony and vestibule, painted the interior, renovated the choir loft, put a new top on the church, installed bathrooms, and put carpet on the floor.

In October 1953 the church voted to build a parsonage. Two thousand dollars was raised on Homecoming Day of that year, and \$12,000.00 was borrowed to complete the work. Mr. J.W Perry, Sr. gave the bricks, and several others donated labor. The lot was given by the Jeff Pearce family. The total cost of this attractive eight room home was \$18,142.45.

The school property was acquired in February 1956 at a cost of \$2,000.00. During the same year we joined the Tar River Baptist Association.

From 1959 to 1963, major remodeling of the annex was completed. A breezeway connecting the church and annex was built in memory of J.W. Perry, Sr.

We celebrated our fiftieth anniversary in 1965. From that time until we celebrated our seventy-fifth anniversary in 1990, we have installed the baptistery, memorial stained windows, and carpeting, and had the pews upholstered and the sanctuary painted.

Four ordained ministers of the gospel have come from this fellowship: Roy Smith, Johnny J. Smith, Coy Jeans, Jr., and Ronald Pierce.

## **Historical Review of Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church**

Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church is located in Little River Township, Wake County, six miles north of Zebulon, NC. It was founded out of the community's deep need for a more spiritual acknowledgement of its devotion to God. What began as local prayer meetings became, on September 25, 1851, an organized church of eleven members.

Hopkins Chapel was named in honor of Joseph F. Hopkins, a charter member and the first church clerk. The first deacons were Matthew Williams and Littleton Privett. Other charter members were James Ferrell, Milly Gay, Lucinda Williams, Midie Williams, Christy Williams, William Ray, Ellen Privett, and Mary Jones.

In 1852 Hopkins Chapel was admitted into the Central Association, with a membership of fourteen and fifty cents in its treasury.

In its 129 year history, the church has been served by twenty-three pastors: M. Williams, M. Freeman (who served two terms totaling twelve years), W. Nowell, A. Purefoy, J. Booth, G. Coppedge, A. Pippin (who served two terms totaling fifteen years), A. Setzer, C. Williams (whose eleven year term was the longest single term), J. Mitchiner, Raleigh Sherron, L. Evans, A. Parrish, Jimmie Atkins, Henry Morgan, Fred Crisp, Johnny Calswell, Virgil McBride, Edward Lehman, Claude Walker, Jim Tate, W.C. Barham, and M.W. Shaw. Rev. Norris Cook has been our pastor since 1983.

The church's first revival, held at about the time of the Civil War under Rev. Free-

man, brought the church thirty-two new members, three of whom were black. Another revival, conducted by Rev. Parrish, brought 126 new members. In the 1930's, under Rev. Evans, forty members were added in one year, thirty-six of them by baptism. Hopkins Chapel presently has 468 members.

The first building, a one room log structure, stood on the site that is now the cemetery. During revivals, brush arbors were constructed to expand seating.

In 1888 a new white framed building with greater seating capacity was erected. This building was enlarged several times to keep abreast of congregational growth. This new building was truly a venture in faith. When the church was struggling to pay off its debt, God came to its aid in the person of B.L. Strickland, who took over the note, giving the church extra time to meet its obligations. God intervened again when, on October 27, 1893, Hopkins Chapel was advertised for sale because of its inability to liquidate debts. God's movement on the hearts of the community brought the generous response that paid the church's debt.

Forward looking and progressive minded since its inception, Hopkins Chapel erected yet another building in 1957. Several additions have since been made, and the purchase of audio equipment has enhanced the church's worship and ministry. In 1963 the present parsonage was erected.

Hopkins Chapel has always been a Missionary Baptist Church, believing strongly that the Great Commission is a command of God that should be obeyed. In 1970 this conviction was given significant recognition when the church approved a budget pledging seventeen cents of each budgeted dollar to causes outside of the church itself (thirteen cents to Cooperate program Causes and four cents to the Association). Increasing individual stewardship has made possible larger gifts to missions each year.

In the early 1970's, Hopkins Chapel decided to leave the Raleigh Association and unite with the Tar River Baptist Association. As hoped, this change has made possible greater progress and ministry to the glory of God. To enhance community ministry, a church secretary was hired in September of 1973.

The 1980's brought several improvements to our church. In 1980 a burglar system was installed and a tape ministry was started. In 1982 a cement ramp for wheelchairs was built, and handicap signs were posted. In 1987 Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church became Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church, Inc. During this same year a reward fund was set up for information concerning Vicki Lynn Von Cannon's death. She was the daughter of our pastor Rev. Norris Cook. In 1989 we started new prayer groups that meet at the church three times a week.

In December 1991 we had our first "Hanging of the Greens" in the church. We also installed a \$4,500.00 sound system.

Hopkins Chapel has aided many pastors who are now serving the Master's cause around the world. Several church members have also been called into full time ministry.

Hopkins Chapel is continually searching for improved ways to glorify God. We are prayerfully considering additional church space and an expanded church staff to meet the needs of our growing community, but we are determined that these shall be accomplished without cutting mission gifts.

In our 139 year history, many dedicated Christians have made possible the wonderful happenings at Hopkins Chapel. We are confident that each of these will be duly noted and rewarded when we stand before the Master. We are rightfully proud of our heritage, but like our founders we cannot be satisfied until every effort has been exhausted to reach the lost. Though thankful for our material blessings, our

greatest joy is seeing souls come to Christ and serve the Master.

Any interested church should first **VOTE** to participate, and then **NOTIFY** the Associational Office that you have voted to be involved.

We are happy to announce that there will be three Vacation Bible School Clinics in our association in 1993. The first of these is called the Earlybird Clinic and is for **PASTORS** and **DIRECTORS only**. It is scheduled for March 30. Two additional VBS Clinics have been scheduled for pastors, directors, and all VBS workers. VBS Clinic I is scheduled for May 13, and VBS Clinic II is scheduled for May 18. The meeting places for these three clinics will be announced at a later date.

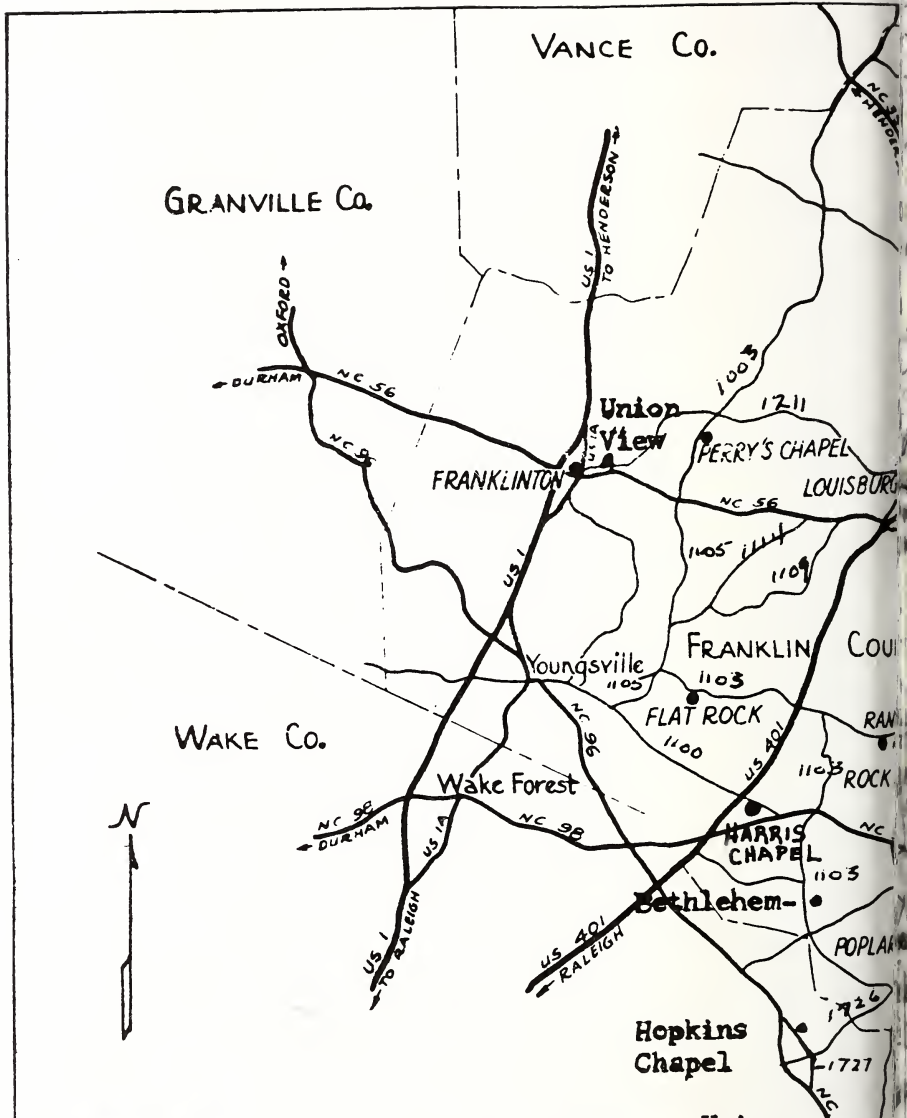

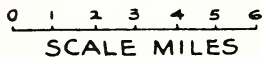

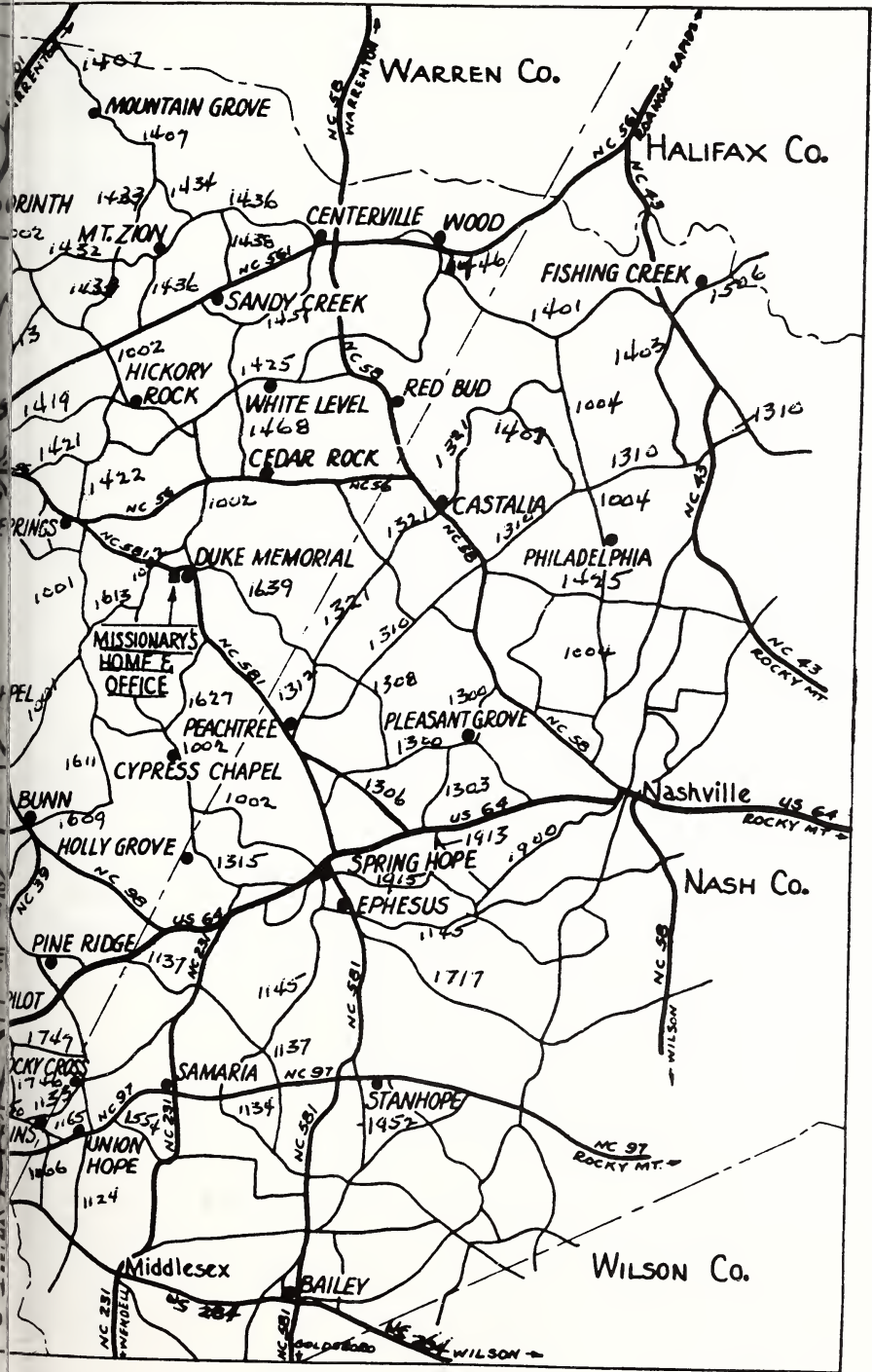

sociation. Several significant discipleship events took place to combine with an overall increased interest in the spiritual growth and development of God's people to make for an exciting and positive year.

## **Woman's Missionary Union Report 1991-1992**

The work of WMU in Tar River is conducted by approximately 1,459 members in 133 organizations of Mission Friends, Girls in Action, Acteens, Baptist Young Women, and Baptist Women. We experienced some growth this year in our number of organizations and members, but we hope you will make this a priority to help us grow even more in 1992-1993. We had eight of our churches who were distinguished organizations last year and we are very proud of these organizations. Social Plains received the first award for ten consecutive years of being a distinguished organization and was awarded a special plaque at the State WMU Convention in March. This takes a lot of hard work and dedication and we hope more of our churches will work toward accomplishing all their mission goals through Woman's Missionary Union.

The purpose of all the age-level organizations is to study missions, engage in mission action and personal witnessing, and to support missions through prayer and giving.

Tar River WMU is governed by a Council of ten women, each state trained to represent all age levels of WMU as well as Mission Action and Enlistment Enlargement. These associational leaders in turn train their counterparts in the local church. Our fall workshop was held at Peachtree Baptist Church on September 8, 1992 with training conferences offered for all levels of WMU.

Several age level activities were planned and carried out during the year. Our Annual Spring Meeting was held at Pilot Baptist Church with 125 attending. The emphasis for the afternoon session was led by Eric Thompson from our Hispanic Mission speaking and encouraging participation and support from our WMU. The response to this was very good and we are grateful for the support of WMU for our Hispanic Mission work. This evening session was highlighted by a special drama presentation from Pat Frazier on the life and ministry of Annie Armstrong. Each year our Annual Spring Meeting is a highlight of our year and we hope that you will encourage all your WMU members, especially your youth groups to attend this meeting. Our Annual Spring Meeting in 1993 will be held at Samaria Baptist Church on April 5.

We participated in several other mission projects this year, but special emphasis was placed on the NC Correctional Center Christmas gifts for the inmates and our Christmas Toy Store ministry. We also contributed \$150.00 to the group from Tar River going on the mission trip to Belize in November.

## **Historian's Report**

### **Outstanding Achievements 1991-1992**

- BAILEY:** We participated in the Bunn Prison Ministry in June. The Senior Adults went to Caswell. The sanctuary was improved by enlarging the choir and pulpit area and adding a choir rail. The Adult and Children's Choirs gave a Christmas musical play and "Hanging of the Greens." We had a Baby Dedication. The GA's observed "Christmas in August." The church became the supervising sponsor/coordinator of the Strickland's Crossroads Hispanic Ministry in Nash County.
- BETHLEHEM:** We received ten new members. VBS was very successful. Sunday School enrollment and Church membership have shown significant increases. Our Building Campaign has progressed, and we will soon be ready to begin our new sanctuary. Our Music program has experienced growth. Special services include: Youth Service, GA and RA Awards, Senior Citizens recognitions, and Pastor Appreciation Day.
- CASTALIA:** We celebrated our one hundredth anniversary on Homecoming. We installed and dedicated pew cushions and chandeliers.
- CEDAR ROCK:** Rev. Steven Rummage received our call as pastor. Five new members came to us by letter and one by profession of faith. We joined the church annuity program. Renovations included putting vinyl siding on the educational building and repairing the plaster on the ceiling and wall.

## Executive Committee Report

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the semi-annual meeting in April.

### JUNE 22, 1992

Rev. Bill Wallace called the meeting to order and led in the opening hymn.

Rev. Jack Rose led in devotion and prayer.

Roll call of the churches indicated forty-five people present, representing nineteen churches.

Minutes of the March 30, 1992 meeting were read and approved.

Rev. Jack Rose was appointed Parliamentarian.

Mrs. Carol Morgan reporting for WMU Council Director Nan Jones, announced that the WMU Annual Spring Meeting had been held at Pilot Baptist Church in April with 150 attending.

Rev. Bill Wallace reported the following: Discipleship Training events for 1993 have already been planned by the Discipleship Training Council Director Wendy Ed-

wards, the Discipleship Fair will be held in October at Flat Rock Baptist Church, a One Day Soul Winning Workshop is scheduled for September, and six of our churches (Duke Memorial, Flat Rock, Hickory Rock, Pine Ridge, Social Plains, and White Level) had youth to attend Youth Evangelism Week at Fort Caswell.

Finance Committee Chairman Richard Morgan gave the stewardship report and explained that a voucher of expected needs was completed by the secretary each month and approved by the Finance Committee.

Georgette Guin, reporting for Music Council Director Nanette Warren, announced that the Associational Choir had sung at the Semi-Annual Meeting and that an Associational Music Clinic would be planned.

Mr. San Wood gave the treasurer's report and encouraged the churches to send monthly contributions because the associational bills are monthly bills.

Mr. Eric Thompson, Pastor at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads reported the average attendance at the mission was fifty-six, a sports ministry had been started, ten more people had received the Lord, and an open house/homecoming service was planned in June to celebrate the one year anniversary of the mission.

Rev. Wallace, giving the report for the Associational Council, explained that to continue receiving funds from the Home Mission Board for the mission at Strickland's Crossroads the Council was making a recommendation that Bailey Baptist Church be appointed as supervising sponsor/coordinator for the mission.

Mr. Steve Jones made a motion to receive the recommendation. The motion was seconded by Rev. Jeff Brooks and carried.

During the recognition of new pastors, church staff, and executive board members, one new member was recognized from Samaria, one from Perry's Chapel, and three from Maple Springs.

Rev. Wallace reporting on the new Associational Missions and Resource Center announced that the site plan was complete and approved, and that the clearing of the property would soon start.

Rev. Wallace gave his Director of Missions Report. He also reported on the used modular units that were being considered for the Strickland's Crossroads Hispanic Mission, the possibility of renting office space at Harris Chapel Baptist Church, and that the property in Justice had been sold.

Mr. Richard Morgan inquired about the Hispanic Mission at Sandy Creek. It was reported that in the off season attendance was about five or six, but during migrant season there was usually about twenty to twenty-five.

Announcements, praise reports, and prayer requests were made.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer led by Rev. George Fox.

September 28, 1992

Rev. Wallace led in the opening hymn.

Rev. Jimmy Pulliam led in devotion and prayer.

Roll call of the churches indicated twenty-five people present, representing fourteen churches.

Minutes of the June 22, 1992, meeting were read and approved.

Mr. Eric Thompson was appointed Parliamentarian.

Mrs. Elaine Lewis, reporting for the WMU Council Director Nan Jones, announced that the Associational WMU Council had attended training in July, the Fall WMU Workshop had been held on September 8, a Book Study/Prayer Retreat would be held on November 1, at Maple Springs Baptist Church, and that soap was being collected for the Women's Correctional Center as an Associational Mission Action

project.

Rev. Wallace announced a training event for Brotherhood and RA Leaders to be held at Red Bud Baptist Church in October. He also encouraged attendance at the Discipleship Fair to be held in October at Flat Rock Baptist Church.

Mr. Richard Morgan gave the finance and treasurer's reports.

Miss Nanette Warren, Music Council Director, announced that the Associational Choir would be providing music at the Discipleship Fair and at the Fall Annual Meeting in October. She also gave a report on Prison Ministries in North Carolina.

Mr. Eric Thompson, reporting on the Hispanic Mission at Stricklands' Crossroads, said that average attendance had been as follows: sixty-seven in July, fifty-four in August, and forty-four in September. Two people have been baptized, four more have received the Lord, and eleven others have made decisions of some kind. A two day VBS was led by members of Flat Rock Baptist Church. There has been good attendance at the sports tournaments and for the Christian Film ministry. A clothes closet has been started at Samaria.

Rev. Wallace reported that with the September payment, the debt to W.E. Rowe would be paid in full.

Mr. Richard Morgan made a motion that the Mission Development Council look into the matter of a written agreement between the Tar River Baptist Association and Mr. W.E. Rowe. The motion was seconded by Rev. Jack Watson, and carried.

Rev. Wallace briefly went over the tentative calendar for 1993, the tentative nominating committee report, the program agenda for the Fall Annual Meeting, and the 1993 proposed budget. He reminded the churches that the recommended goal for associational giving from the churches is five percent of undesignated receipts.

Rev. Wallace reported that the associational office had been broken into twice in July. There was no theft insurance, but a benefactor had replaced the copier, typewriter, and calculator.

Mr. Steve Jones reported that the thefts were still being investigated.

Rev. Bill Wallace gave his Director of Missions report.

Mr. Steve Jones made a motion to accept Rev. Wallace's recommendation that work on site preparation for the new associational center be stopped until more funds came in. Dr. C. Ray Pruette seconded the motion. After much discussion, an amendment was made that research be done to discover what must be done before stopping. It was also suggested that as little money as possible be spent to complete the necessary site work. It was understood that work could be resumed when more funds are available. The motion to accept the amendment was made by Rev. Jeff Brooks and seconded by Mr. Richard Morgan. The votes on the amendment and on the amended motion were carried.

After prayer requests were made, the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Wallace.

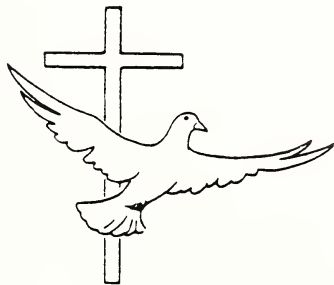

# **Christian Action League of North Carolina, Inc.**

1991-1992

For the 10th consecutive year, the gambling industry has not been able to secure passage of any gambling legislation such as a lottery or pari-mutuel betting (horse and dog racing.)

The industry made its biggest push ever during the 1991-1992 legislative session. They secured 14 of the most effective and best known lobbyists that money can buy to push for their cause, but to no avail. When the legislature adjourned on July 24th, the gambling industry threw in the towel realizing that they did not have the votes in the NC House to pass their state-sponsored gambling bill, the lottery.

What made the difference? People like you did. You secured the commitments from your legislators that the role of government is not to exploit their weakened citizens, but to appeal to their strengths. Gambling violates that age-old principle.

There is one thing for sure. The pro-gambling forces will be back. However, the issue will be decided on November 3 at the General Election. If you elect legislators who are opposed to state-sponsored gambling, it will not make any difference how many lobbyists the gambling industry employs. The decision is in your hands. How do the candidates from your area stand on this issue?

There are other very important moral issues that you need to discuss with your legislative candidates. Some of them are:

1. **SEX EDUCATION** . . . Are our young people being deceived into believing that "safe sex" outside of marriage is possible and okay? The current rise in venereal diseases and teenage pregnancies, and the related emotional problems tells us we must focus attention on this issue.
2. **ABORTION** . . . The Supreme Court ruling regarding the abortion law of the state of Pennsylvania opens the door for further restrictions and conditions under which abortions can be performed - leaving this up to the states. This year we have worked on trying to get legislation passed requiring parental consent for abortion on minors, and reducing abortion funding. Both of these measures passed in the House but died in the Senate.
3. **ALCOHOL/DRUG ISSUES** . . . It is so important that we continue to address problems related to alcohol use and abuse. Reducing the blood alcohol standard for DWI from .10 to .08 was one of our targets this year, but it also failed to pass in the Senate after passing in the House.

We cannot overemphasize the importance of getting to know who your candidates are and how they stand on these key issues. Plato put it so well: "The price that good people pay for not being involved in politics is to be governed by people worse than themselves."

Thank you for standing with us in the cause of applied Christianity.

## **North Carolina Baptist Hospital**

1992 Report to the Associations

Baptist Hospital utilizes the skills and training of more than 5,700 employees to provide outstanding health care in settings as varied as the Brenner Children's Hospital, the Trauma Center, and the J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation. Last

year, the Joint Committee on the Accreditation of Health Care Organizations said that Baptist Hospital ranks in the top 10 percent of all hospitals in the nation.

During the past year, the hospital admitted 24,000 patients. It performed 16,662 surgical procedures, including 1,020 open heart operations, 29 kidney transplants and 80 bone marrow transplants. The AirCare helicopter flew 742 missions.

Total revenue of the hospital during the year was \$407,280,000. Cooperative Program gifts from the churches were \$656,180, which was applied to the budget of the Department of Pastoral Care. The Mother's Day Offering and other special gifts from the churches totaled \$424,406 and was used for benevolent care for patients who had no other means of paying their hospital bills.

The Pastoral Care Department, which is funded in part through the Cooperative Program, provided clinical pastoral education to 55 students during the past year. The Pastoral Care staff provided more than 53,000 specific ministries to hospital patients, family members, and staff. And, the counseling division provided over 24,000 counseling sessions. The professional staff of the Pastoral Care Department continues to respond to requests for help from churches in conflict, from pastors and their families across the state.

The various services of the hospital are readily accessible to all North Carolina Baptists and others. A telephone call to the Health-On-Call Office (919-716-2255) can secure an outpatient appointment with any one of the various specialists on the staff or can begin the process of gaining admission to the hospital if that need is indicated.

Charges for the hospital services compare very favorably with those in other hospitals of the state. Reports from the North Carolina Medical Database Commission indicate that Baptist Hospital's charges are lower than the average in other hospitals which provide similar services and are considerably lower than in the other teaching hospitals. Our hospital did not have an increase in its rates for the current fiscal year of July 1, 1992 - June 30, 1993.

The hospital's physical plant continues to expand. A new 840-space parking deck was opened in January. A new Emergency Department/Dietary building which will also make possible more private patient rooms is under construction now. Construction will begin soon on the 170-bed skilled and intermediate care nursing facility and on the J. Paul Stich Center on Aging and Rehabilitation. This expansion will make it possible not only to serve more people, but to serve them better.

The staff and patients of Baptist Hospital are grateful to North Carolina Baptists for the heritage they have given the institution and for the moral and financial support they continue to give to its ministry.

## **Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc.**

### **1992: MAKING LIFE FOR OLDER ADULTS THE BEST OF TIMES**

One of the greatest needs facing North Carolina Baptists as they move into 1993 is the ability to provide affordable quality long-term care services to the "Aged Saints" of our Convention.

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life are those individuals in the age category of 85 and older. That age group is growing at five times the rate of any other population segment in Baptist life. The 85 and older age group is also that age group most likely to need the services provided by a long-term care institution like Baptist Retirement Homes. Unfortunately in 1992 in our state, there were not enough nursing care beds to meet the needs of the growing number of Older Adults



who were functionally impaired and needed the services of a long-term care provider. Complicating the shortage problem was the fact that the cost of those beds was high (more than the average North Carolina Baptist older adult could pay). And to make matters even worse, in spite of the high cost of those beds, often the quality of care provided through those beds was fair at best.

In other words, the greatest problem facing North Carolina Baptist Older Adults in 1992 was the fact that there were simply not enough affordable quality nursing care beds available for use by people like you and me and our Older Adult family members.

Having become aware some years ago of the above mentioned problem, Baptist Retirement Homes (for the last five year period) has been working to develop a system of affordable quality nursing care beds throughout the State for use by North Carolina Baptist Older Adults. New nursing care beds became available in the Piedmont area of our state in 1989 (through the opening of the Brookridge Retirement Community). In 1992, affordable quality nursing care will become available to Western North Carolina Baptist Older Adults through the new Rickman Nursing Care Center being built on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. It is our institution's hope that by 1994 affordable quality nursing care will also be available to Eastern North Carolina Baptist Older Adults as well. Your support has made the above possible.

In 1992, North Carolina Baptists through their gifts to the Cooperative Program and North Carolina Offering for Older Adults made it possible for Baptist Retirement Homes to provide financial assistance to more than 60% of all the Older Adults living in its health care related facilities. In addition, Western North Carolina Baptists contributed more than \$2.5 million toward the construction of the new Rickman Nursing Care Center in Ashville. . . a new facility that will enable Baptist Retirement Homes to make life for many Western North Carolina Baptists truly. . . the Best of Times.

Thank you North Carolina Baptists for your support. Please continue to pray for our ministry and its ability to meet the ever growing needs of the Older Adults of our Convention.

### **North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc.**

1992 Annual Report to Baptist Associations of North Carolina

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, as an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, is committed under the guidance of the Holy Spirit in serving North Carolina Baptists and other in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis.

Assets are managed under the direction of the Foundation Board of Directors with interest income being paid in perpetuity to Baptist causes named by the donor or to the donor (or heirs) for their lifetime (or specific period of time) before the income is then paid in perpetuity to the named Baptist causes.

Earned income distributed and paid to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes during fiscal year 1991:	\$1,100,606
Earned income distributed and paid to individuals (with Baptist causes named as future beneficiaries) during the fiscal year 1991:	\$1,062,643
Total market value of Foundation assets, December 31, 1991:	\$36,283,384

During 1991, the Board of Directors, with the assistance of a nationally recognized investment consulting firm, adopted a detailed Investment Policy to govern the types of investments that its fiscal agents may make in keeping with the Christian commitment of the Foundation, as well as attempt to insure that the future spending value of the invested trust fund dollar will keep up with inflation. A study revealed that during the past five years the fiscal agents managing the Foundation assets ranked near the top nationally with other investment managers who operate under investment guidelines similar to the ones provided by the Foundation Board.

The Foundation staff and operations are housed in a building adjacent to the Baptist State Convention Building in Cary. Individuals and church groups are invited to call and arrange a visit of their Trust Agency's office building.

The significance of the Foundation services was illustrated in a recent experience that staff members had while eating in a fast food restaurant in Durham. In taking a seat adjacent to a table occupied by a young black police officer, we observed the enthusiasm of a white lad of about 4 years of age as he stood talking to the officer. As the mother and a younger child, coming from another area of the restaurant, called for the lad to join them, he walked away from the table 6 to 8 feet, turned around and said to the officer, who was now standing and preparing to leave, "Can I give you a hug?" After an affirmative answer from the officer, the child walked over to the officer, reached around his legs and gave him a hug. The officer confirmed to us that he wished the world was filled with people like this child. The example corresponds to what so many already have done through the Foundation. As they approach the time of leaving this earthly life, they look back affectionately on what the Lord has done for them during their life and decide that they want to leave an expression of their love through an enduring and lasting gift (a "hug", if you please) that will serve the Lord until His return.

### **Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention**

The Commission seeks to develop Christian morality among Southern Baptists by emphasizing the application of the principles of the Christian faith both in personal and public life. An ongoing effort is made to provide Christian ethics services to other Southern Baptist agencies, state Baptist conventions, associations, churches, and individuals to enable Southern Baptists to deal more effectively with the serious moral challenges of our time. The commission encourages the formation and activation

of Christian Life Committees at all levels of Southern Baptist life beginning with the local church. By coordinating and correlating Southern Baptist social concerns, the Commission helps to make the greatest possible impact for Christ in support of the Convention's total objectives.

The presence of full-time Washington-based staff has enhanced greatly the Commission's ability to fulfill the portion of its program statement which calls on it to "bring to bear Baptist statements, convictions and insights in the field of Christian ethics and religious liberty upon important policy making groups" and to "present Southern Baptist insight for consideration in the planning of federal government programs on children and youth, aging, housing, employment, public health, and other matters pertaining to social welfare."

During the past year, the Washington and Nashville staffs have worked diligently to share both with Congress and the White House numerous convictions and concerns of Southern Baptists. Commission staff members have been active in corresponding and meeting with members of both the legislative and executive branches of the federal government concerning areas of Southern Baptist concern. Also, with the approval of the Convention's Executive Committee, the Commission launched a new publication, *Salt*, in a newsletter format (six issues a year), which seeks to keep Southern Baptists informed on public policy and issues active in the administrative, judicial and legislative branches of the federal government. The goal of *Salt* is to inform and motivate Southern Baptists to influence their president, senators, and representatives in a responsible, scriptural manner.

The Commission has also been particularly active during the past year in leading a strong coalition of numerous groups supporting legislation restricting alcohol advertising and requiring mandatory health warnings on alcohol advertisements. Abortion, drug abuse and pornography are among the other issues on which the Commission staff has been involved through the Washington office in the past year. The Commission remains particularly concerned about the serious threats to religious liberty posed by recent Supreme Court decisions and works closely with a coalition of groups trying to remedy these threats both through legislation and judicial action. The Commission also continued to pursue the fulfillment of its program statement this past year through the filing of *amicus curiae*, "friend of the court," brief in cases involving abortion, pornography and religious liberty.

In the religious liberty arena, the Commission also filed its first independent *amicus curia* (friend of the court) brief in the U.S. Supreme Court in the *Lee v. Weisman* school graduation prayer case. In this brief, the Commission asked the Court to overturn a lower court order prohibiting invocations and benedictions containing the word "God" at public school commencement exercises. The Commission has also asked the Court to revise the "Lemon" test and suggested a new test to replace Lemon, a test which is premised on the principles of government accommodation of religious practices which exist independently of government action and are not induced or coerced by government. The Commission believes students must have the right to free exercise of *their* religious liberty while in school, to associate voluntarily with one another during lunch, recess and free periods to pray, study the Bible and to discuss religious issues with each other without government control or censorship.

The Commission's 1992 annual national seminar in Washington, D.C. was entitled "Citizen Christians: Their Rights and Responsibilities." The program combined interpretive biblical themes with addresses on subjects such as "How Christians Can Make A Difference Inside Government" and "What You as a Christian Can and

Cannot Do.” The seminar also included a White House briefing and a congressional breakfast where seminar participants had an opportunity to interact with various senators and congressmen about issues of concern to them.

The Commission continued its long-standing leadership in the field of race relations by sponsoring a consultation which brought Southern Baptists of many racial and ethnic backgrounds together. The consultation was very helpful in addressing the goals the Commission seeks and the obstacles the Commission faces in encouraging our denomination and our society to be more Christ-like on this issue in the years ahead. The Commission also provided leadership in the National Coalition Against Pornography and during Bible Preaching-Church Administration Weeks and National Student Weeks at Ridgecrest and Glorietta. Commission staff also served as resource persons in events held in numerous state conventions as well as for other Southern Baptist agencies and entities.

The Commission continued its responsibilities assigned by the Southern Baptist Convention for education and action related to the issue of hunger. Commission staff produced the 1991-1992 World Hunger Awareness/Action Guide entitled *Hunger*. This guide was mailed to every church in the Convention to encourage and to support the observance of World Hunger Day. The commission-produced film, *What Shall We Do in a Hungry World?*, which had previously been mailed in videotape form to Southern Baptist associations, continued to be used significantly in heightening Southern Baptists' awareness on this vital issue.

### *The Biblical Recorder*

Last year we reported to you: “The Baptist world is changing rapidly; some would contend it is for good while others think it is nothing short of a tragedy.” In these past 12 months, the changes are beyond description--on the world scene and in Baptist life.

Whatever one's view may be, there is an indispensable need for correct and reliable information. The *Biblical Recorder* was born and continues to serve for that purpose. Never was the *Recorder* more needed than now.

People are reading less than any time in recent history. It is true of secular publications, it is true of wholesome books from respected libraries, it is true of religious publications. We live in an electronic age where we often think we know the answers to the issues only to discover we do not.

An informed Baptist is a better Baptist; an uninformed Baptist may be an uninvolved or disruptive Baptist. No democracy, including our local churches, can survive long without an informed, involved constituency which makes decisions based upon accurate information from reliable sources.

The most important thing facing us at this point is to get the *Recorder* into more Baptist homes than ever before. Your support as a subscriber and reader and your encouragement to others will enable the paper to better serve the constituency with accurate and helpful information delivered to Baptist homes and churches. We need your help!

In order to save churches large amounts of money and to increase the readership of the *Recorder*, Church News Service (CNS) was launched in 1990. This system lets any congregation have their church newsletter incorporated into the *Biblical Recorder* which saves staff time, postage and printing costs. Usually, for less than what it costs to produce the church newsletter, CNS gives the entire Baptist communication

package to each family in the congregation.

The paper focuses more and more attention on North Carolina Baptists with news, features and inspirational articles which will encourage individuals and churches in their witness and ministry. One sure way to conquer problems and overcome the barriers to effective witness and ministry is to have the facts, know the issues and be adequately informed.

# Constitution

## ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association.

## ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches; and, to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Association.

## ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

A. The Association shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the pastors of the member churches, and the duly elected messengers of these churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers, and any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred is entitled to two additional messengers for each one hundred members, or major fraction thereof in excess of two hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

B. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Association shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Association.

C. The Association shall meet bi-annually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session.

## ARTICLE IV - RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION FELLOWSHIP

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Association by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator and the Director of Missions shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

## ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Association by church letters; to send messengers to the Association Sessions; to give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and, to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Association. The Clerk shall furnish the churches with two printed forms for their annual church letter; these are to be mailed at least six weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Association. The churches are requested to have the church letters in the hands of the Clerk not less than one week before the fall meeting of the Association.

## ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

A. The Association shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

B. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or church letter at more than two consecutive Annual Fall Sessions, or that treats with contempt its purposes and requirements, or upon application of a church for its own dismissal.

#### ARTICLE VII - STAFF

The staff of the Association shall be a Director of Missions and a Secretary. Other staff members may be added by vote of the Association in annual or called session, or by the Associational Executive Board if said positions can be justified and funded.

#### ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF THE STAFF

A. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to lead the Association to fulfill its mission faithfully, effectively, and lovingly. His role is three-dimensional: (1) mission strategist, (2) minister to the churches, pastors, and other church staff members, and (3) general leader of the Association. Within the limits of his time and ability, he is to respond to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Association.

B. It shall be the duty of the Associational Secretary to provide administrative support services to the Director of Missions and to the Tar River Baptist Association.

#### ARTICLE IX - OFFICERS

The officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Trustees.

#### ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

A. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to plan for and preside over the annual and called meetings of the Association-In-Session and the Associational Executive Board, and to encourage fellowship and mutual care among the churches. He shall open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. The Moderator shall appoint a Parliamentarian to serve at each Session of the Association and the Associational Executive Board Meetings. He shall also serve as ex officio chairman of the Associational Executive Board. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two one-year terms in succession.

B. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to assist in developing fellowship and mutual care among the churches and church leaders. He shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in the Moderator's absence, serve as vice-chairman of the Associational Executive Board, and serve as Chairman of the Associational Council.

C. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the Association-In-Session and of the Associational Executive Board, and to make this information available on request. The Clerk shall use all diligence to have the record of transactions printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible and to mail the church clerks reminders about, and forms for, the annual church letter. The Clerk shall also serve as ex officio Secretary of the Associational Executive Board.

D. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to assist in receiving, accounting, and disbursing of all the Association's monies as authorized by the Association or the Associational



Executive Board. By virtue of his office the Treasurer shall be an ex officio member of the Finance Committee.

E. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to act as the legal agents of the Association and shall hold title of all property of the Association. In the name of the Association they shall be authorized and empowered to receive title to real and personal property, and to sell and convey or mortgage same upon authority duly given by the Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association. They are also responsible for keeping an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Association, a copy of which is to be kept on file in the Associational Office. The Trustees are to be three in number, and they are to serve for a term of three years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

#### ARTICLE XI - COMMITTEES

The Committees of the Association are administrative in nature. These administrative Committees are as follows: Nominating; Credentials; Finance; Resolutions; Time, Place, and Preacher; Program; Constitution; Christian Education; Strategy; Properties; History; and others deemed necessary or desirable. Each Committee shall be under the supervision of the Associational Executive Board. Committee members shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association and shall expire on the last day of the fall meeting of the Association the next year, at which time the new Committee will take office. Members are allowed to serve more than one term in succession.

#### ARTICLE XII - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

A. The **NOMINATING COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to nominate all associational officers, leaders, committeemen and council representatives with the exception of associational staff members. This committee is to be appointed by the Moderator of the Association, and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year.

B. The **CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Association in determining when churches are of like faith and order, and when they can be properly accepted in the fellowship of the Association. It is also the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Association as voting members of the Association.

C. The **FINANCE COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Association in securing, administering, and reporting its finances. This committee will plan and propose an annual budget to the Associational Executive Board and suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. This committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. They shall serve on a calendar year basis concurrent with the Treasurer's term and shall retain at least two of its members from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as an ex officio member of this committee.

D. The **RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to assist the Association in studying resolutions for adoption by the Association or the Associational Executive Board. This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Association's feelings in regard to the Annual Meeting, Officers of the Association, Host Churches, and other matters.

E. The TIME, PLACE, and PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place and preacher for the annual Associational Meeting.

F. The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association and the host pastors of the Annual Meeting. It shall be their duty to assist the Association in planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Association. They shall receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form for the sessions of the Association which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business.

G. The CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to make recommendations relative to constitutional changes. This Committee shall receive all proposed changes and/or amendments to the Constitution and/or Bylaws of the Tar River Baptist Association, and upon study of said changes and/or amendments make recommendations to the Association concerning said changes and/or amendments.

H. The CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to keep before the churches of the Association all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

I. The STRATEGY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Association in determining strategic objectives and staying on course in achieving them.

J. The PROPERTIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Association in properties administration. This Committee shall develop and recommend policies and procedures for using associational facilities and equipment.

K. The HISTORY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Association's life and work.

#### ARTICLE XIII - INSTITUTIONAL AND AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES

The Institutional and Agency Representatives of the Convention shall include the following: Annuity Board, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes, Christian Higher Education, Religious Literature, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Missions. The representatives for these institutions and agencies shall be responsible for providing information to the churches during the year, and/or giving reports on the work of the institutions and agencies at the Annual Meeting of the Association.

#### ARTICLE XIV - MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

The Mission Performance Councils undergird and give support to the work of program related ministries of the Association. Training leadership shall be a primary responsibility of these Councils. All Mission Performance Councils shall be under the supervision of the Associational Executive Board. These Mission Performance Councils are as follows: Seminary Extension, Ordination Advisory, Music, Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Vacation Bible School, Recreation, Media Library, Pastoral Ministries, Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions Development, Youth Ministry, and Family Ministry.

## ARTICLE XV - DUTIES OF THE MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

A. The SEMINARY EXTENSION COUNCIL shall direct any Seminary Extension Program for the churches affiliated with the Association. This Council shall be composed of at least (5) members.

B. The ORDINATION ADVISORY COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to act only in an advisory capacity for churches seeking assistance in examining prospective candidates approved for ordination. This Council shall conduct its work within the guidelines of the Association.

C. The MUSIC COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. This Council shall plan and implement the music program of the Association. They shall recommend to the Program Committee the music for the Annual Meeting, and they shall enlist accompanists for all Associational Meetings.

D. The SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of the ASSISTeam to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate Associational Sunday School Work.

E. The DISCIPLESHIP TRAINING COUNCIL shall be composed of age level leaders (Preschool, Children, Youth, Adult) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the total Associational Discipleship Training Program.

F. The WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION COUNCIL shall consist of the leadership recommended by the WMU Nominating Committee and elected by the Associational WMU. This Council will have the responsibility of planning, promoting, conducting, and evaluating Associational WMU work.

G. The BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL shall be composed of the officers of the Associational Brotherhood. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, and evaluate the work of Associational Baptist Men and also the work of Associational Royal Ambassadors.

H. The VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. The Vacation Bible School Council Director is the leader of the VBS team and shall plan and promote the Associational VBS Clinic. The team of age-group VBS leaders who comprise this team shall be responsible for conducting the Associational VBS Clinic.

I. The RECREATION COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members whose duty it shall be to help plan, coordinate, promote, and conduct the entire recreation program of the Association. They shall be available to assist any Associational entity with the planning and conducting of recreational activities. The work of this Council includes setting up and supervising the Associational Basketball Program, and any other Associational Sports Program that may be started. This Council will also plan, promote, and conduct the Annual Royal Ambassador Track Meet, and the Annual Royal Ambassador Car Competition.

J. The MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL shall consist of at least three (3) members. This Associational Church Media Library Organization is often referred to as TACMO. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to provide for the mutual sharing of inspiration and information for furthering the Church Media Center Ministry of the affiliated churches.

K. The PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL shall be composed of the following: (1) Associational Pastoral Ministries Director, (2) Church Administration Services Coordinator, (3) Deacon Ministry Coordinator, (4) Vocational Guidance Coor-

dinator, and (5) Church Weekday Education Coordinator, and any others that may be deemed necessary or advisable. The duties of this Council shall be to determine the pastoral ministries emphasis in the Associational Program and to schedule the events in cooperation with the total programming of the Association. The major task of the Council shall be the development and training of ministries through conferences, workshops, clinics, awareness meetings, retreats, and ministries support groups.

L. The EVANGELISM COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. It shall be the duty of this Council to plan and promote any evangelism programs, training projects, and rallies in the Association. It shall also be the responsibility of this Council to keep evangelism before the pastors and laypeople of the Association.

M. The STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for stewardship development and promotion within or among the churches of the Association. It will be the task of this Council to seek to lead the churches to set specific, attainable, measurable stewardship goals.

N. The MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall consist of at least seven (7) members. This Council shall be responsible for missions development in the total program of the Association. The Council shall not only be concerned with already established missions, mission work, and mission activities; it shall be concerned with beginning new mission work. It will be their responsibility to study the missionary needs of the Association and make recommendations concerning new work. They shall also recommend mission projects or activities with which the churches in the Association may cooperate. They shall strive to get each church in the Association to elect or appoint a Church Missions Development Council.

O. The YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall plan youth related ministries for the Association including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

P. The FAMILY MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for helping to plan, promote, and conduct any program emphasis related to family life. This Council should strive to include the needs of senior adults, single adults, marriage partners, parents, and children.

#### ARTICLE XVI - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

The Associational Council shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, the Directors of the various Program Councils of the Association, and three members at large. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to assist the Director of Missions in planning, coordinating, promoting, and executing the Associational Programs, making recommendations to the Associational Executive Board or to the Association in its Annual Fall Meeting. It shall also be the duty of this Council to plan the Annual Associational Calendar. This council shall meet quarterly on another Monday evening prior to each Associational Executive Board meeting, and at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator.

#### ARTICLE XVII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

A. The Associational Executive Board shall be composed of the Associational officers as set forth in Article IX, Director of Missions, along with key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Pastor, Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Board Members shall be members of the church they represent. If a church does not have these leaders, it may appoint a representative for a committee prior to the

regular Annual Fall Meeting and shall submit the names of the elected members with the church letter.

B. The Associational Executive Board shall meet quarterly usually during March, June, September, and December on Monday night following the fourth Sunday of the month unless a conflict necessitates moving the meeting to Monday after the third or fifth Sunday. The Associational Executive Board may meet at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator for the purpose of transacting special or urgent business.

C. Although each church should earnestly strive to get its full contingent of key leaders to attend, there is no quorum requirement for transacting business at a regular or called meeting of the Associational Executive Board.

D. The Director of Missions is an ex officio member of the Executive Board and does not have the power to vote.

E. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as follows:

1. The Executive Board of the Association is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary, and to define his duties.

2. To act for the Association between regular session of the body.

3. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.

4. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.

5. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Association the annual budget for Associational missions, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered in the Association.

6. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Board in the name of the Association shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Association.

#### ARTICLE XVIII - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Association, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

#### ARTICLE XIX - AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and the Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of Associational meeting, also said amendment(s) will be presented to the afternoon session and voted on no earlier than the evening session.

#### ARTICLE XX - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to *Robert's Rules of Order*.

#### ARTICLE XXI - BUSINESS PROCEDURE

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with a prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Association or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator, and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. Any resolution to be presented to the Associational Executive Board and/or Annual Associational meetings must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Association and published in the Associational newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the Associational sermon.

10. Reports of committees on Convention matters must be brief - that on missions combined not exceeding five hundred words, and others not exceeding three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to: Librarian of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina; *Biblical Recorder*, Raleigh, North Carolina; Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina; Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee and State Baptist Convention.

13. The host churches in their welcoming addresses to the Association shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words) of the host churches, whose histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Association.

### AFTERNOON SESSION

(NOTE FROM CLERK: Some reports are not printed in the Proceedings. They are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

1. The 163rd Semi-Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Moderator Jimmy Pulliam, Rock Spring Baptist Church.

2. Rev. Stephen Rummage, Cedar Rock Baptist Church, led the opening hymn, "Serve the Lord with Gladness."

3. Dr. Larry Williams, Louisburg Baptist Church, welcomed everyone to the church. He said that it had been a pleasure to work with Maple Springs Baptist Church in preparing for the Semi-Annual meeting. He also expressed gratitude for all the contributions made to the Watkins family and announced that over \$12,000 had been given through the Tar River Baptist churches and individuals. He then read scripture from 1 Corinthians, Chapter 13 and led in prayer.

4. Rev. Jimmy Pulliam organized the session and appointed Rev. Wayne McNeill, Bunn Baptist Church, as the Parliamentarian.

5. Dr. C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church, presented the report of the program committee and made a motion that it constitute the agenda of the 163rd Semi-Annual Meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association with any necessary additions that may need to be made. The motion was duly seconded and carried.

6. The following new pastors were recognized and welcomed to the association: Rev. Jody Griffin, Spring Hope Baptist Church, and Rev. Jim Lamb, Oak Grove Baptist Church.



7. Rev. Bill Wallace, Director of Missions, announced the Eastern North Carolina Evangelism Workshop to be held at Caswell on May 7-8, 1993.

8. The histories of the host churches were presented by Miss Ernestine Perry, Maple Springs, and Mr. Willard Morton, Louisburg.

9. Rev. Steven Rummage led in singing "Send the Light."

10. Mr. Bill Yates presented the report of the Baptist Hospital. The hospital opened with eighty-six beds and now has 806 beds. The Joint Commission on Hospital Accreditation ranks NCBH in the top nine percent of America's hospitals. It is one of only seventeen hospitals in the U.S. with a "AA" bond credit rating. It is one of only twenty-six comprehensive cancer centers in the nation. Its "Angels of Mercy" neonatal transplant team is the largest in N.C. The hospital has 12-25 chaplains. In 1924 the first Mother's Day Offering was collected for the Baptist Hospital. This offering is used for people who have little or no insurance or other source of help. Last year \$423,000 was received from NC Baptist.

11. Mrs. Ruth Lowe, Director of the Brookridge Retirement Community, presented the report on the Baptist Retirement Homes. The goal of the Baptist Homes is to offer affordable, quality care to older adults. There are homes in four locations in North Carolina: the Western NC Baptist Home in Asheville will house 150; the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem will house approximately 300; the Hamilton Baptist Home in Hamilton will house 25-30; and the Taylor House in Albemarle will house 25-30. Brookridge is the newest facility and is three and one-half years old. The special offering that is collected for the homes is used to help those that cannot afford to pay for quality care. Needs that are being considered are the offering sub-acute care, terminal care, and short-term care.

12. Mr. Charles Tanner presented the report of the Baptist Children's Homes. Four hundred children across North Carolina are being cared for. Funds are mostly provided through the special offering and through the Cooperative Program. The Baptist Homes offer children a chance. The following are available to offer care to children: Residential Group Care Campuses, Group Homes, Pre-school Day Care, Emergency Care, Therapeutic Camping, Maternity Care, and Teen Mother/Baby Care. Also offered is parent aide, co-planning/counseling, family life education, financial assistance, crisis intervention, and specialized foster homes.

13. Special music was presented by Rev. Steven Rummage.

14. Mrs. Eileen Coffey presented information on the crisis pregnancy center in Raleigh called the Pregnancy Life Care Center. It is a nonprofit, nondenominational, Christian center. It offers ministry to women in crisis pregnancy situations and is a Christ-centered ministry. The center is run by four paid staff and numerous volunteers, and governed by the Board of Directors. The center offers free services such as counseling, pregnancy testing, a twenty-four hour hotline, pregnancy education, abortion alternatives, housing, support groups, clothing, transportation, etc. Since the center opened it has served over 8,000 clients. Churches can get involved by telling others about the center, referring people to the center, volunteering and being trained as counselors to work in the center, donating baby items, and sending donations (the sole support of the center.)

15. Rev. Wallace presented his Director of Missions' report.

16. Mr. Cam Stallings, Pilot Baptist Church, shared a testimony of his trip to Florida. Pilot Baptist Church raised enough money so that a disaster relief team could go and help in the crisis at Florida due to Hurricane Andrew. The team consisted of Yates Murphy, Jesse Murphy, Wallace Stallings, and Cam Stallings, all from Pilot; and Milton Hobbs from Lake Royale. The team saw much devastation in the Homestead area where they

worked. Over 670,000 homes had been destroyed and materials were scarce. A church in the area, even though damaged by the storm, provided a place to eat and shower for volunteers. The team helped one man who had eleven children by putting a roof on his home. The family was still living in the home despite the damage and were very grateful to finally be dry. Mr. Stallings concluded his testimony by urging others to volunteer in time of disaster.

17. Mr. Herby Alford, Flat Rock Baptist Church, shared about one of the mission trips to Belize (three teams have been from the TRBA). The most recent team, consisting of five men and four women, helped to build a dormitory for boys and girls. In November this team spent nine days living and working in a small village in Belize to help build a training center for Belize pastors. While there they visited churches and conducted services. Each night Bible Study was held. They also visited with refugees that had no running water or electricity, and no jobs. The team painted, did electrical work and plumbing, mixed concrete, preached, etc. There will be another team going to Belize in October 1993. Volunteers can support this mission trip by going or by giving.

18. Rev. Bill Wallace announced Community Baptist Church has never had bathroom facilities and needs a larger classroom. The association is trying to help them, but volunteers are needed. This is a good opportunity to minister at home.

19. Rev. Steven Rummage led in singing the hymn, "To the Work."

20. The Associational Clerk, Mrs. Georgette Guin, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, presented the Executive Board Report.

21. Trustee Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock Baptist Church, presented the Trustee's Report.

22. After prayer requests were made, Rev. Jimmy Pulliam led in prayer.

23. Rev. Steven Rummage led in singing the hymn, "Our Best."

24. Rev. Jody Griffin, Spring Hope Baptist Church, read scripture from Luke 17, and led in prayer.

25. Special music was presented by Rev. Steven Rummage.

26. The annual sermon was delivered by Dr. Don Dowless, Corinth Baptist Church.

27. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Rev. Larry Williams.

## EVENING SESSION

1. A mini-concert was performed by the Associational Choir and solos were presented by Mrs. Susan Parker, Pilot Baptist Church and Mr. John Hopkins, Bunn Baptist Church.

2. Rev. Jimmy Pulliam called the meeting to order and expressed appreciation to the host churches.

3. Rev. Tom Cabaniss, Maple Springs Baptist Church, read scripture from II Corinthians and led in prayer.

4. Rev. Steven Rummage led in singing the hymn, "Hark, the Voice of Jesus Calling."

5. Mr. Georgette Guin presented the Treasurer's Report.

6. Sunday School Director, Rev. David Averette, Franklinton Baptist Church, said that the roll of Sunday School was to reach the lost and teach the saved, and is the church's most effective tool. He announced that the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) was available to help the churches. He also announced the Associational Sunday School Training School to be held September 17-18, 1993. It will be for the workers for the new church year.

7. Discipleship Training Director, Mrs. Wendy Edwards, Spring Hope Baptist Church, announced that the Bible Drill Training scheduled for September 2, was to prepare for the 1994 season; and the Facilitating Spiritual Growth Conference, scheduled for October,

was designed to show how to help people grow spiritually. She reported that the association would be represented by two at the Bible Drill competition in Boone.

8. WMU Director Mrs. Nan Jones, Social Plains Baptist Church, reported that 154 had registered at the WMU Spring Meeting, that the WMU Council was available to help the churches, that a GA Mother/Daughter Banquet would be held at Pilot on May 15, and that the fall workshop would be on September 7, at Flat Rock for the workers for the new church year.

9. Brotherhood Director Mr. Wayne Gupton, Red Bud Baptist Church, said that the TRBA was part of Region Four and that several projects had been planned for Region Four. A Korean Church will be built in Raleigh and a Disaster Relief Trailer will be built to supplement the Disaster Relief Van. Help will be needed during both projects. He announced the following upcoming events: RA Track Meet at Southern Nash High School on April 24, Brotherhood/RA Training at the Key Leadership Conference on August 16, Brotherhood/RA Training on October 26, and an RA Banquet on November 4.

10. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, reporting for the Credentials Committee, said that attendance at the Spring Semi-Annual meeting was as follows: twenty-eight churches represented by seventy-six messengers, nine alternate messengers, nineteen pastors, eight officers, and forty-two guests; totaling 154 people.

11. The Resolutions Committee Report was given by Mrs. Faye Harrison, Sandy Creek Baptist Church as follows:

#### **RESOLUTION 1: APPRECIATION TO THE HOST AND ASSISTING CHURCHES**

Whereas the Louisburg Baptist Church and the assisting Maple Springs Baptist Church, have graciously welcomed and cared for the messengers and visitors to the 1993 Semi-Annual Meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association by opening their doors and their hearts, and

Whereas they have provided us with excellent hospitality and a delicious meal,

Be it therefore resolved that we express to both churches our heartfelt appreciation for lovingly and abundantly providing for the needs and comforts of all who attended this 163rd Semi-Annual session of the Tar River Baptist Association.

#### **RESOLUTION 2: COMMENDATION TO THE MODERATOR**

Whereas Rev. Jimmy Pulliam has faithfully served as Moderator of our Association for the past one and one half years, presiding with dignity and fairness, and conducting the quarterly meetings of the Associational Board with expertise and proficiency,

Be it therefore resolved that we express to Rev. Pulliam our love with genuine appreciation and gratitude for the leadership and service he has provided throughout his term of office.

#### **RESOLUTION 3: GRATITUDE TO THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS**

Whereas Rev. Bill Wallace serves the Tar River Baptist Association with vision, commitment, and excitement, and with a leadership style that is sacrificial and unselfish, and

Whereas his care and love for all our churches and their members is quite evident, and

Whereas he continually strives to be a pastor to the pastors, a missions strategist, and the leader of the association,

Be it therefore resolved that we express to Rev. Wallace our appreciation and support, our desire to follow his leadership in the true spirit of Christian cooperation, and our commitment to pray for him in all of his endeavors in the service of the Lord.

A motion to accept the resolution was made by Rev. Wayne McNeill, Bunn Baptist Church. The motion was duly seconded and carried.

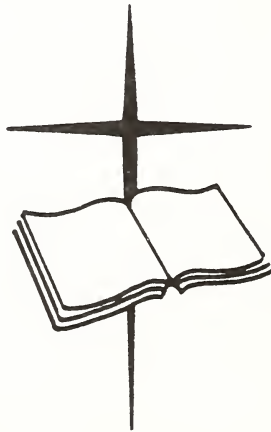
12. Rev. Bill Wallace announced the North Carolina/New York Partnership. He said that New York is a pioneer area in missions and the TRBA is considering a partnership with the Hudson Baptist Association in New York. He introduced Rev. Jim Arrant, Church Planter/Strategist and Director of Missions at the Hudson Association.

13. Special Music was presented by the Associational Choir.

14. A special message was brought by Rev. Jim Arrant, New York.

15. Rev. Wallace announced that a love offering would be taken at the door for the Hudson Baptist Association.

16. The meeting was adjourned after Rev. Pulliam led in singing, "Blest Be the Tie" as a benediction.



## A Brief History of Louisburg Baptist Church

The founder of the Louisburg Baptist Church, Samuel Wait, was a man of many talents and of great dedication. In addition to being the first pastor of Louisburg Baptist Church, he was also instrumental in the beginnings of both the N.C. Baptist State Convention and the *Biblical Recorder*. He helped organize Wake Forest College of which he was the first president.

Under the leadership of Samuel Wait the Louisburg Baptist Church was organized in 1836. The church was accepted into the Tar River Baptist Association in the fall of 1836.

According to early records the young church gave much attention to matters of church discipline. Committees were appointed to investigate members who did not attend meetings on a regular basis. Some members were "excommunicated" for various transgressions.

Early in its development the church was composed of black members and white members. Black deacons were given the responsibility for the discipline of black members. In 1855 the membership consisted of thirty-two white members and seventy-three black members.

During the Civil War (1861-65) the white members withdrew from the church. They worshipped with other congregations.

In 1869, C.M. Cooke moved to Louisburg. He and Dr. J.L. Carroll, pastor of Maple Springs Baptist Church, were instrumental in the reorganization of the church. The church was reorganized in 1870 with Dr. Carroll serving as pastor.

The last decade of the nineteenth century and the early years of the twentieth century were prosperous times in Louisburg. The Gaston-Raleigh Railroad built a spur line from Franklinton to Louisburg in 1885, and a thriving tobacco market was established. The population of the town which is listed as 800 in 1885 had grown to 1,500 by 1898 and to 2,000 by 1914. As new people moved to the area, the membership of the church reflected this growth.

The first recorded Constitution and Bylaws of the church were adopted in 1855. In 1963, a new constitution was prepared by a committee led by G.M. Beam, Jr. The constitution incorporated many improvements in the business structure begun during the ministry of Dr. John Simons (1936-38) and refined and implemented during the ministry of Dr. A. Paul Bagby (1938-45). The Advisory Board had become the business body of the church. It consisted of the deacons (then 12 men and 12 women, now 9 men and 9 women) and the major officers of the church.

Local folklore tells that when the church was first organized the members met in a log building. It may be that the church met in a log building until a church could be built. The church which was later built was located between Cedar Street and Spring Street across from the Male Academy grove.

After the white members left the church during the Civil War, the black members purchased the church building between 1865 and 1871. When the white Baptists reorganized, they met in a church building formerly occupied by the Presbyterian Church on the corner of Middle and Main Streets (the present location of the church). In June, 1877, the church purchased a site on Sunset Avenue and constructed a building.

The present place of worship was completed in 1904. It was erected after the Baptist Church made an exchange of their building for the property owned by the Presbyterian Church on the corner of Middle and Main Street. Additional Sunday School rooms were added later adjoining the basement. A new educational building was constructed in 1960-61. In 1978, while Bill Almond was pastor, the church made major renovations of the sanctu-

ary and purchased a new pipe organ. At the time of this writing renovations are in progress on the educational building.

Throughout the years the church has placed a great deal of emphasis on its educational programs. In 1849, the church organized its first "Sabbath School" with Guilford Lewis as the first superintendent. In 1938, Miss Elizabeth Lassiter was named the first religious education director. The Sunday School reached its highest attendance in the late 1950's and early 1960's while Aubrey Tomlinson was serving as pastor.

The church has also been very involved in missions and missionary education. In 1898, inspired by Mrs. Forrest Smith, wife of the pastor, the women of the church organized the Woman's Missionary Society. The Brotherhood was organized in 1955 with Mr. W.J. Cooper, Jr. as the first president.

The church has supported many local mission projects and sought to have its building used by various service groups. The building has been used for meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous since 1973. It has also been the meeting place for Boy Scout Troops and the location for Bloodmobile drives through the years. The church has given active support to Care and Share (a service group providing food and clothes to the needy), Habitat for Humanity, the Literacy Council, and a newly formed Inter-church Council.

The church has been a strong supporter of international mission efforts. Besides its contribution to the Cooperative Program and other special missions offerings it has also sponsored a refugee family from Vietnam. At the present time the church gives financial support to the Baptist Seminary in Zimbabwe.

The church has also placed an emphasis on music ministry and youth ministry. In recent years the church has ordained to the gospel ministry two of its Ministers of Youth: David Holland and Tom Cabiniss. Others who have been licensed or ordained by the church are Guilford Lewis, Josiah Crudup, Horace Hilton, Clarence Bass, Lemar Wheeler, H.G. Mixon, J. Daniel White and Lane Dyke.

During the last part of his pastorate, Dr. Bill Almond (who served 1972-1981) began programs in lay training in pastoral care for deacons. Dr. Larry Williams, the present pastor, has continued this training program and helped organize task force groups to focus on shut-ins, crisis ministry, hospital ministry, prospective members, and membership development.

In the 1980's there were a number of significant events and achievements which included the following: (1) In 1981, a campaign under the leadership of Mrs. Lucille Ford to retire a \$6,000 building note resulted in contributions of more than \$14,000; (2) In 1983, some sixty church members made Chrismons for the Christmon tree; (3) In 1986, the church held a year long celebration remembering 150 years of history; (4) The church, under the leadership of Allen Shearin, conducted a two-year study of the church's finances resulting in a ministry-based budget and an estimate of giving program; (5) In 1987, the church began a monthly newsletter with Mrs. Emma Ruth Stewart as the first editor.

In 1991, the church elected a Denominational Relations Committee to keep the church informed of the controversy in the Southern Baptist Convention. The committee, under the leadership of George West for the first two years, led in a study of Baptist history, presented three oral reports and is now preparing a written report.

The church has been fortunate in having long pastorates in recent years. Since 1946, the church has had only three pastors: Rev. A.S. Tomlinson (1946-1971), Dr. Bill Almond (1972-1981), and Dr. Larry Williams (1982-present). In 1983, Aubrey Tomlinson was honored by being named Pastor Emeritus in a special worship service. In 1992, Larry Williams was honored by an appreciation dinner and plaque for his ten years of service.

As one views the long history of Louisburg Baptist Church and its present status, certain positive features stand out. Among these are the following: (1) An interest in education, especially missions, youth and music; (2) Determination to have a worthy place of worship; (3) General interest in the Baptist denomination as a whole; (4) Acceptance of orderly forms of services of worship; (5) Cordial relations with other denominations of the community; (6) Stability within the church as evidenced by lengthy tenure of recent pastors; (7) Freedom of the pulpit; (8) Acceptance of diversity in the church; (9) Members caring for each other, especially in times of crises and; (10) Appreciation of its heritage.

## History of Maple Springs Baptist Church

Maple Springs Baptist Church was fully constituted in July 1793, and in October of the same year it joined the Kehukee Association. The leader in organizing the church was Rev. William Lancaster. The deacons for that year were Jacob Jones, Elisha Denby, and Josiah Ely. In 1831, Maple Springs became a charter member of the Tar River Baptist Association. Rev. Thomas Crocker, a leader in the establishment of the Tar River Baptist Association, was the minister of the church at this time. Rev. Crocker served the church for twenty-two years. Between 1832 and 1904, the Association met at Maple Springs five times.

Other ministers of note through its first one hundred years were N.A. Purefoy, G.M.L. Finch, Dr. William Royall, C.E. Taylor, George W. Newell, Elijah F. Beachum, Baylus Cade, and George M. Duke. Rev. Finch and Dr. Royall were its pastors during the War Between the States. C.E. Taylor and William Royall were professors at Wake Forest College.

Two major events that occurred in the 19th Century were the building of the present church in 1858, and the Centennial celebration in 1893. In 1858, almost thirty men of the church made pledges for a new structure. Those making the largest pledges were W.D. Webb, J.E. Lankford, and Wiston Perry. The Centennial celebration was held July 27, 1893. The attendance was said to be "immense," with Charles M. Cooke making the historical address and Rev. George M. Duke delivering the speech of welcome.

Rev. Duke served Maple Springs for almost forty years. His popularity was felt throughout the Tar River Baptist Association, for he served as pastor at several other churches in the Association. At the time of his death in 1918, his popularity was so great that the suggestion was made to arrange for the erection of a monument to him on the Court House Square. In October 1918, possibly the largest crowd ever gathered at the church in a memorial to the late Rev. Duke. A liberal offering of more than \$4,000 was made by the approximate 3,000 people in attendance.

After Rev. Duke's death, a group of ministers referred to as "the Wake Forest boys" served the church. These included W.B. Morton, B.E. Morris, Ira S. Harrell, Sankey L. Blanton, J.S. Hopkins, and J. Clyde Yates. After Rev. C.L. Gillespie, Rev. L. B. Reavis assumed duties as full-time pastor in 1935. In 1937, Rev. John Edwards came. During his three years of service, lights were installed in the church. In the early 1940's, W.N. Brookshire, R.O. Bennett, and Elmo M. Powell served. During Rev. Powell's tenure, seven Sunday School rooms were added and the church was brick veneered.

After Rev. Bill Gordon who served in the late 1940's, came a number of "Seminary men": Wiley C. Guthrie, John Grant, C.H. Norris, J. Parker McLendon, Bufford Raffield, Marvin Bass, Melvyn Salter, A.J. Conyers, and Forest M. Gale. These pastors filled the years between 1952 and 1977, with the longest periods of service being those of Rev. McLendon (5 years), Rev. Raffield (6 years), and Rev. Salter and Rev. Gale (4 years). During the stay of Rev. Salter, the educational building was dedicated. Built in memory of Mr. Clyde P. Harris and his wife Annie Fleming Harris, the building was made possible through the generosity of their son, Mr. T. Mort Harris. The Harris family had generously supported the construction of the pastorium which was completed in 1962, during Rev. Raffield's ministry.

Rev. Michael C. Brooks (1977-1981) ushered the church into the 1980's. A number of physical improvements were made during the ministry, including a set of chimes. From 1981 to 1988, Rev. Grady W. Edwards served as pastor. Numerous improvements were made in these years, including the addition of a steeple, given by Mr. Jesse Fulghum in memory of his wife and mother. Two outstanding interim pastors served the church in the late 1980's and early 1990's. Rev. Bill Hern served in this capacity twice, and Rev. Gordon Joyner came later. After Rev. Edwards, John Marvin Butler served as pastor between 1989 and 1991, and Rev. Joyner followed as interim. From the time Rev. Grady Edwards came until the departure of Rev. Joyner several events of note occurred. On February 7, 1988, the church received a portable baptistry. In September 18, 1988, at the time of a homecoming, a new organ was dedicated, Stained-glass windows honoring the memory of Harold Allen, Nellie Southall Hayes, and Merle Wester were installed. The area around the church spring was landscaped largely through the efforts of Thurston Allen and Willard Winborne. A sound system was donated to the church by the Phelps family, and lights were installed along the church walk through the generosity of the Leonard family.

In February 1992, Rev. Tom Cabaniss became the pastor of Maple Springs. Under his leadership and guidance, the church continues to grow and to reach out in service to the community. The contributions of its membership to the spiritual growth of the area cannot be measured. Our prayer is that we continue, as those in the past, to honor and glorify the name of Christ.

## Director of Missions Report

The Tar River Baptist Association has an illustrious history spanning the years since its organization in 1830. It is a good association with a rich heritage and a glorious past. Through the years dedicated and gifted pastors have joined hands and hearts with committed and gifted layleaders in the proclamation of the Gospel, and in the development of a caring fellowship.

For a little more than six years I have had the opportunity of serving as your Director of Missions. During that time I have experienced the joy of being a part of ministry with you. God has blessed our joint efforts. Existing mission ministries have been strengthened and new ones begun. Four churches have been accepted into the fellowship of our association. Two Hispanic Missions have been sponsored. Preaching and/or teaching minis-



tries have been started at Louisburg Manor and Lake Royale. Contributions from the churches to all mission causes have significantly increased (Cooperative Program giving has increased from \$128,098 in 1987 to \$152,510 in 1992; giving to the Association has increased from \$46,464 in 1987 to \$82,621 in 1992). Short-term missionaries from the Tar River Baptist Association have ministered in such places as Togo, Belize, Brazil, South Carolina, Florida and New York. Christmas toys and other commodities have been provided for youngsters who otherwise might have received nothing. Congratulations are certainly in order for the greater Tar River Baptist Family for all of her past victories and achievements.

While we are grateful for all that has been accomplished, we must admit that inside and outside the association there are many ministry needs and opportunities that have never been addressed. I believe that within the Tar River Baptist Family we have the gifts to meet any ministry need facing us. Tar River Baptists are wonderfully and effectively gifted for ministry. We can and we should address existing ministry needs and opportunities. To do so we must give careful attention to at least four areas of concern: (1) Vision, (2) Availability, (3) Attitude, and (4) Stewardship.

Our vision must go beyond maintenance and survival goals. That is to say that we must plan and live on more than a month-by-month or season-by-season basis. Maintenance goals will cause us to focus primarily on keeping our buildings and equipment fixed, our leadership positions filled, and our bills paid through the summer until contributions pick up in September. Survival goals will preoccupy us and keep our focus only on such immediate concerns as "trying to keep our heads above the water," or "hoping the cash surplus will be larger at the end of this month than it was at the end of last month," or "trying to survive and do only what I have to until my term expires."

We must not allow day-to-day pressures or immediate concerns to tempt us to postpone looking at our reason for being and the role God wants us to fulfill both now and in the future. I challenge you to look to the future with faith. Focus on possibilities instead of problems. Doing so will help guide us toward accomplishing the mission of the association, and it will be a deterrent to just doing project planning and maintenance ministry.

Concerning our availability, we must continually offer ourselves to be used of God. He is more concerned about our availability than our ability. He does extend His call, but He is also big on volunteerism. Volunteers are absolutely necessary to the success of any association. Present workers must be encouraged and new ones enlisted as the association grows and broadens its base of missions or ministry. We must develop a strong spirit of cooperation and expectation in serving the Lord through the Tar River Baptist Association. Care must be taken not to allow the lack of volunteers to shorten the missions and ministry arms of our association.

Our attitudes must be positive and cooperative. I cannot over stress the need of a good attitude and a right spirit. I don't care what one might do, if he does it with the wrong attitude or spirit, even the best things he does will turn sour. A pure heart and a right spirit can make up for all kinds of blunders and mistakes. The most valuable members of any church or association are those with a proper attitude and a right spirit about everything. After all, it is love, forgiveness, commitment, and togetherness that really count.

Negative, defeated attitudes must be changed. They must be replaced with positive attitudes. If one begins with doubts or negative thoughts, he is already pre-programmed for failure. Have you ever heard anybody say anything like this: "Why should we give to the association; what's it ever done for us?" or "Why build a new associational center; the old one was good enough for grandpa and grandma, and it's good enough for me?" or "Why try to start a church for Hispanics; some of our own churches are in need of

repair or renovation?" Do you think that those who say such things really have the best interest of the association at heart.

I recommend that all of us concentrate on the good things about our association. Be positive when talking with others about your association or any of its work or leaders. If something troubles or concerns you, go directly to the Director of Missions, the Moderator, or the Vice-Moderator. Gossiping about it to anyone and everyone will do more harm than good. First and foremost, talk to the Lord about it. The song writer was dead on target when he wrote, "O what peace we often forfeit, O what needless pain we bear, all because we do not carry everything to God in prayer."

Be positive! Make the association and its work a real priority in your lives. Remember this: **WE CAN ACHIEVE WHATEVER WE THINK WE CAN ACHIEVE - NOTHING MORE.**

Our churches must be more generous and systematic in their support of associational and world missions. There must be an understanding that it will take grace, grit, and greenbacks to do what God wants to be done. As the end of each month approaches your Associational Staff and Finance Committee should not have to worry about whether there is enough money to meet payroll and pay monthly bills. That worry can be completely eliminated by the faithful and regular support of all our churches. The idea that the purpose of stewardship, or a stewardship committee, is to help God's people conserve their funds is contrary to a Biblical teaching. A responsible theology of stewardship encourages a congregation or an association to invest money in missionary and evangelistic ministries both at home and "to the ends of the earth."

Even in this time of denominational conflict and confusion, there must be a vision that sees beyond our own doorsteps. Mission giving through the Cooperative Program has been the life blood of Southern Baptists. I would like to see each church in the Tar River Baptist Association giving no less than ten percent of all undesignated offerings to the Cooperative Program. Furthermore, I would like to see that percentage increased annually until each church reaches a level of giving to the Cooperative Program of at least twenty-five percent of undesignated gifts. I would also like to see each church not already doing so, increase its level of giving to the Tar River Baptist Association to five percent of all undesignated offerings. I realize that may be too big of a step for some of our churches to take all at once. If so, why not begin where you are and make some annual increase in your gifts to associational missions, even if no more than one-half of one percent? By doing so, you can gradually bring your level of associational giving to five percent. With that kind of associational support from all of our churches there would be no limit to what we could accomplish.

Please know that I love the Tar River Baptist Association - its churches and its people. I'm not at all pessimistic about our future. If we stay focused on our purpose, claim the strengths and gifts God has given us, and look to the future with faith, perhaps only eternity will reveal all that we accomplish. I have faith to believe we will rise to the challenge before us.

## Associational Executive Report

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the last Annual Meeting.

DECEMBER 14, 1992

Moderator for the session was Rev. Jimmy Pulliam. Fifty-five people were present, representing twenty churches.

WMU Director Nan Jones reported that 150 people attended the Prayer Retreat on November 1, Mrs. Elaine Lewis and Mrs. Annette Coppedge went on the missions trip to Belize, and fourteen churches participated in the soap collection for the Women's Correctional Center.

The treasurer's report was given by Mrs. Georgette Guin who explained the November Financial Statement and reported that \$3,910.74 would be needed by the end of December 1992 to clear all accounts for the year.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren reported that music was provided for the annual meeting, and that there would be a youth musical in 1993 if there was enough interest.

Mr. Eric Thompson reported the following: the new mobile unit is in place at Strickland's Crossroads, some men from Pilot Baptist Church helped build the ramp, others gave donations toward expenses of setting up the mobile unit, Mrs. Addilene Leonard made curtains, the mission now has eleven baptized members, and an individual has set aside funds for educational activities for the children.

Mr. Epp Catlett gave an update on the associational property.

Rev. Bill Wallace gave his report, and expressed appreciation to Mr. John Rock and Mr. Richard Morgan for providing buildings for the Toy Store Ministry.

Mr. Leo Stallings gave information about the Gleaning Network which is headquartered in Durham.

Rev. Wallace reported that the Belize Mission Team had put up the walls of a dormitory building, and conducted evening worship services in some of the churches.

MARCH 29, 1993

Moderator for the session was Rev. Jimmy Pulliam. Roll call of the churches indicated fifty-five people present, representing twenty-seven churches.

WMU Council Director Nan Jones announced the WMU Annual Spring Meeting to be held at Social Plains on April 5. She reported that the Tar River Baptist Association had been well represented at the State Annual WMU meeting at Ridgecrest March 26-28. She shared that Elaine Lewis had been elected to serve on the State WMU Board (the second person from Tar River to serve in its history). Other Tar River historical facts given were: Ephesus Baptist Church received recognition for achieving the level of "Distinguished" for 10 consecutive years (the second church ever in Tar River); and the first group of Acteens Activators in Tar River are from the Sandy Creek Baptist Church.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton reported that there had been a good turn out at the Family Missions Night in January, however, he hoped there would be more next year. He expressed appreciation for the work of the Associational RA leaders and encouraged attendance at all RA events.

Sunday School Council Director David Averette reported that only two churches had been involved in the Sunday School Growth Campaign: Franklinton and Union View. He announced that the Associational Assisteam had received training, and is prepared and ready to assist the churches in any way. He announced that an Associational Training School

has been planned for September 17 and 18. This training opportunity will be good for the new Sunday School leaders who will serve in the coming year.

Rev. Wallace announced the Bible Drill Training scheduled for September 2, at Spring Hope, and the Facilitating Spiritual Growth Conference on October 5, at Harris Chapel.

Finance Committee Chariman Bill Spruill presented the February financial report and announced that as of March 29, all bills and payroll had been paid, leaving a balance of \$1,777.85.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren announced the Associational Music School scheduled for April 6, at Pilot Baptist church, 7:00-9:00 P.M. Staff from the Baptist State Convention will lead the clinic and the "Glory" songbooks will be used. The group attending the Music School will sing at the Associational Semi-Annual Meeting.

The 1992 year end report was given by Mrs. Georgette Guin.

Strickland's Crossroads Hispanic Pastor Eric Thompson reported the following: financial statements for the Missions are available, an average attendance of twenty to thirty people at the mission during the first quarter of 1993, a young girl was baptized on March 14, the sports and film ministries will be continued this summer, a group is coming from Texas to lead in Summer Vacation Bible School, the new time of the services are Sunday School at 5 P.M. and Worship at 6 P.M., and the major need now is clothing, especially smaller sizes.

Rev. Bill Wallace gave his report. He also presented the program for the Semi-Annual Associational Meeting which was unanimously approved.

1. The 163rd Fall Annual Meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 P.M. by Moderator Dr. C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church.
2. Mr. John Hopkins, Bunn Baptist Church, led the opening hymn, "Serve the Lord with Gladness."
3. Rev. Wayne McNeill, Bunn Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.



4. The session was organized by Dr. Pruette, and Mr. Epp Catlett was appointed Parliamentarian.

5. Dr. Pruette presented the program. Rev. Wayne McNeill made a motion printed program be adopted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Gerald Nelms, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, and the vote carried.

23. Rev. Calvin Knight reported on the Baptist Retirement Homes of NC.

24. Special music was presented by Rev. George Fox, Pleasant Grove Baptist Church.

25. Rev. Steve Blake, New Hope Baptist Church in New York, spoke about the North Carolina partnership with New York, and brought a message from the book of Luke.

26. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Rev. Wayne McNeill.

#### EVENING SESSION

1. Dr. C. Ray Pruette called the meeting to order.

2. Rev. George Fox led in singing the hymn, "Go Forth and Tell! O Church of God."

3. Dr. Paul Carlisle, Interim, Rock Spring Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.

4. Dr. Pruette expressed appreciation to Bunn Baptist Church, and to Rock Spring Baptist Church for hosting the Fall Meeting.

5. Mr. David Averette, Franklinton Baptist Church, gave the report for the Sunday School Council.

6. VBS Director Joann Wallace, Pilot Baptist Church, recognized the twenty-two churches that sent in VBS reports. She reported that for the summer of 1993, total VBS enrollment reported thus far was 2,053, with forty-one professions of faith, and two hundred nine prospects for Sunday School. She also reported that Pilot reached "Standard," Franklinton "Excellent," and that Beulah had conducted VBS at Oxford Orphanage.

7. Mrs. Wendy Edwards, Spring Hope Baptist Church, gave the Discipleship Training Report.

8. Miss Jessica Clark, the 1993 State Youth Tournament winner from Burnt Swamp Association, presented her winning speech, "Why I Exist."

9. Mrs. Lottie Lou Dickens, Ephesus Baptist Church, gave the report for the WMU Council, and announced a GA Foreign Mission Study and Sleepover to be held on November 5, at Rocky Cross Baptist Church.

10. Mrs. Diane Ray, Pearce Baptist Church, announced that the Tar River WMU and the North Roanoke WMU were planning to prepare gift boxes for the inmates of the Fountain Correctional Center in Rocky Mount. She said that each church would be asked to donate the items needed for this mission action project.

11. Mr. Wayne Gupton, Red Bud Baptist Church, gave the report for the Brotherhood Council.

12. Rev. Marc Tilley, Union Hope Baptist Church, gave the report for the Evangelism Council.

13. Mr. Jimmy Cone announced the "Here's Hope" Crusade planned for 1995.

14. Miss Nanette Warren, Pilot Baptist Church, gave the report for the Music Council, and extended an invitation to all the churches to go Christmas Caroling in Louisburg in December. She announced that anyone who played a musical instrument would be needed at the Associational Spring Meeting. She also encouraged pastors to bring their music directors to the "Getting To Know You" meeting in 1994.

15. Rev. George Fox led in singing the hymn, "Hark, the Voice of Jesus Calling."

16. Rev. Wallace gave his Director of Missions Report. He reported that the Digest of Letters for 1993 showed an increase in baptisms, membership, total receipts, Cooperative Program giving, and gifts to the association. He presented the Executive Committee Report and encouraged churches to send their representatives to the quarterly Board Meetings so they could stay abreast of what is happening in the association. He expressed appreciation for all the churches did to make it possible for the first team to go to New York. He encouraged future participation in the New York Partnership. He announced the Christmas Toy Store Ministry and the World Missions Conference. He also announced that volunteers were needed to do construction on a Korean Church in Cary, NC.

17. Miss Nanette Warren presented a monologue on the association.

18. Rev. Wallace introduced Mr. and Mrs. Terry Alford, Dr. Chester Jones, and Mr. Tom Lolley.

19. Special music was presented by Terry and Jenny Alford, Ephesus Baptist Church.

20. Rev. Gordon Joyner, Holly Grove Baptist Church, led in prayer.

21. Dr. Chester Jones, Director of Missions for Truett Baptist Association, brought a message on "Strength in Unity."

22. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reporting for the Credentials Committee, said that attendance at the Fall Annual Meeting was as follows: forty-one churches represent-

ed by 110 messengers, nine alternate messengers, twenty-five pastors, thirteen officers, and thirty-two guests; totaling 189 people.

23. The Resolutions Committee Report was given by Rev. DuPre Sanders, Franklinton Baptist Church as follows:

## RESOLUTIONS

I. Whereas, Bunn Baptist Church, assisted by Rock Spring Baptist Church, has provided us with fine facilities, a delicious meal, and wonderful hospitality: Be it therefore resolved that we express our appreciation to these two churches for their every effort on our behalf.

II. Whereas, the Program Committee has prepared a most interesting and informative program for our 1993 Fall meeting: Be it therefore resolved that we express our gratitude to each person who appeared on the program and to this committee for their work.

III. Whereas, the officers, leaders, committees, and Director of Missions have done an outstanding job in guiding our Association: Be it therefore resolved that we express our gratitude and appreciation to each of them for the unselfish way they have given of their time and talents for the furthering of God's kingdom through the ministry of the Tar River Baptist Association.

A motion to accept the resolution was made by Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church. The motion was duly seconded and the vote carried.

24. After closing comments from Dr. Pruette and Mr. Strawbridge, the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Mr. Strawbridge.

## History of Bunn Baptist Church

In April 1875, a group of people living in the vicinity of Bunn School house came together and decided to organize a Sunday School. The local school house was chosen as the meeting place. It was constructed of logs, with a board roof, a stick and dirt fireplace and chimney. It was located about three hundred yards east of the junctions of highways 39 and 98, at what is now called "Old Bunn."

Mr. Clinton Perry was asked to organize and superintend the new Sunday School. Mr. Perry lived across the Tar River about three miles away from the school house. He walked the distance, including rowing across the Tar River each Sunday until his resignation.

About 1880, a new one room frame school was built at the junction; and the Sunday School was held there until 1904, when a new building was erected about one hundred yards to the south. It was in this building that Bunn Baptist Church was organized in 1911. The charter membership of Bunn Baptist Church was composed entirely of members from Poplar Springs Baptist Church. Other churches which have been organized from Poplar Springs are Pilot, Pearce and Pine Ridge. The church has been in the Tar River Baptist Association for most of its existence.

Bunn Church continued to meet in the school house at "Old Bunn" until 1914, when it moved to the Bunn School Building, meeting there until 1917. At that time, the present church building was completed on lots given by the North State Development Company of Rocky Mount.

Parsonages were constructed in 1948 and 1971 and an educational building was added in 1960. Various other improvements have been made since that time. The church has been served by 22 different pastors.

Over the years, the people of Bunn Baptist Church have taken seriously Christ's command to evangelize, teach and minister. Since 1911, 575 people have been baptized by the church, and 1.25 million dollars has been given toward the work, 155,000 of that to missions, representing approximately 12% of total gifts.

Currently, a new long range plan is being developed that will help the church to continue the rich tradition of service to our Lord. Our hope is in Christ and our prayer is for all who will join us in the mission of reaching our world until the Lord's return.

## History of Rock Spring Baptist Church

"We, the undersigned members of the Rock Spring Baptist Church, do covenant and agree that we will do the best of our ability, support and sustain this, the Baptist Church of Christ, upon the Holy Word of God."

Thus began the Rock Spring Baptist Church on April 26, 1874, under a brush arbor. Rock Spring is located in Franklin County, seven miles of Louisburg on Highway 39.

From this group of thirteen charter members, the membership increased to sixty-one in the first year. A.J. Underhill and John Odom were the first deacons.

On January 31, 1874, Wilson T. Strickland and wife, Mirilda, gave two and three-eighths acres of land, and in 1876 a building was erected just south of the present building. Trustees were Wilson T. Strickland, Bryant Wilder, A.J. Underhill and John H. Odom.

On April 7, 1894, Mr. M.T. Howell and wife, Millie Ann, gave an acre of land adjoining the original plot, and the auditorium of the present building was begun and was in use by 1897.

In May 1923, a building committee was appointed to formulate plans for Sunday School rooms. That committee was composed of D.V. Cheaves, John B. Wilder, W. Seba Strickland, Frank M. Baker, and Melvin C. Wilder. In 1926, these rooms were in use.

In August 1952 Arthur T. Howell and wife gave one-half acre of land for the purpose of building a parsonage, and in June 1953 the parsonage was occupied by its first residents, Rev. and Mrs. C.L. Holland and son, Steve. This building was considerably enlarged in 1960.

In November 1961, the church began an addition at the rear of the sanctuary which included classrooms, choir loft, restrooms, and a large basement. Work toward the completion and refinement of this project has continued at various times since.

On January 17, 1966, W. Clyde Privette and wife deeded to Rock Spring Baptist Church 0.2 acre of land, making total acreage of the church grounds 4.3 acres.

In 1974, a church sign was erected at the entrance of the driveway, and the parsonage was repainted.

In 1975 the basement, including a kitchen was completed. The fifty year old metal roof of the church and Sunday School rooms was replaced, and the sanctuary was painted. The ceiling was lowered at this time.

During 1976, the space heaters in the parsonage were replaced with central heat and air conditioning.

In 1977, the parsonage was painted on the inside, and carpet was installed. Central heat was installed in the basement of the church.

In 1978 David Strickland gave 0.6 acre of land adjoining the present cemetery.

In 1979 the parsonage was enlarged and repainted.

In 1980 the outside of the church was covered with aluminum siding.

In 1981 the country road through the church property was paved.

In 1982 a large porch and steps were added to the front of the church.

In 1984 the central air and heating units were replaced and installed underneath the church. One acre of land was acquired on the north side of the present property for future building and expansion of the parking area.

The year of 1985 was one of growth, remodeling, and renovation. Two ceilings were removed, and the original ceiling and exposed beams were restored. New carpet was installed in the sanctuary. A gift of \$2,500.00 from the estate of Willard D. Cheaves went toward installing a baptistery and remodeling the choir loft. Eighteen new members were added to the church roll.

In the late 1980's, a tennis court and basketball court were added to the church property, and renovations were done to the parsonage.

In 1992, a church steeple was donated in memory of Victor Stallings, and work was begun on a new fellowship hall, four classrooms, a kitchen and two bathrooms.

We make no claim of a perfect record, but reflecting on a small congregation with varying degrees of talent and commitment working with forty-three different pastors, we may well do as St. Paul did at a certain point as he traveled the Appian Way to Rome, "thank God and take courage."

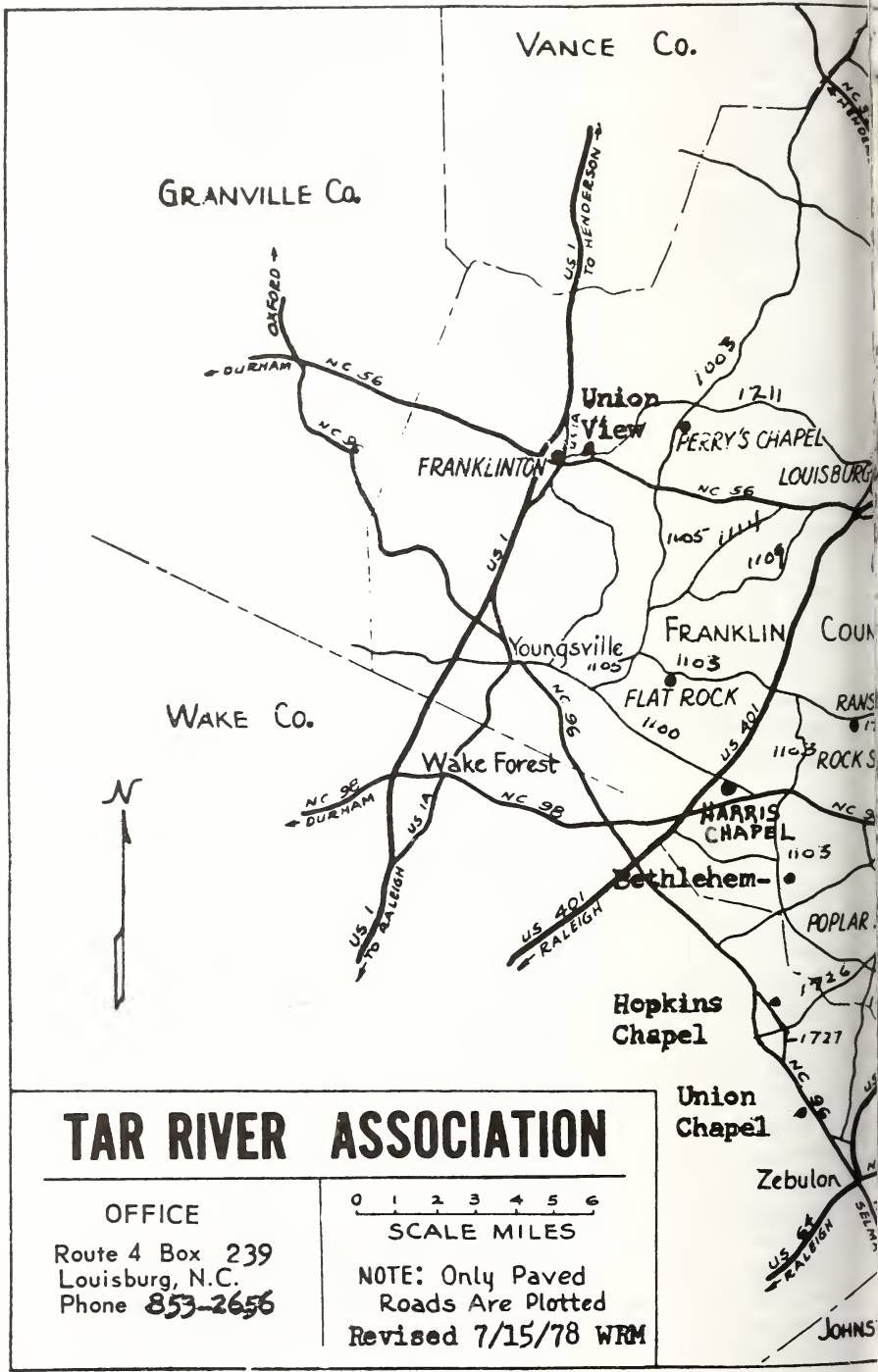
## **Sunday School Report**

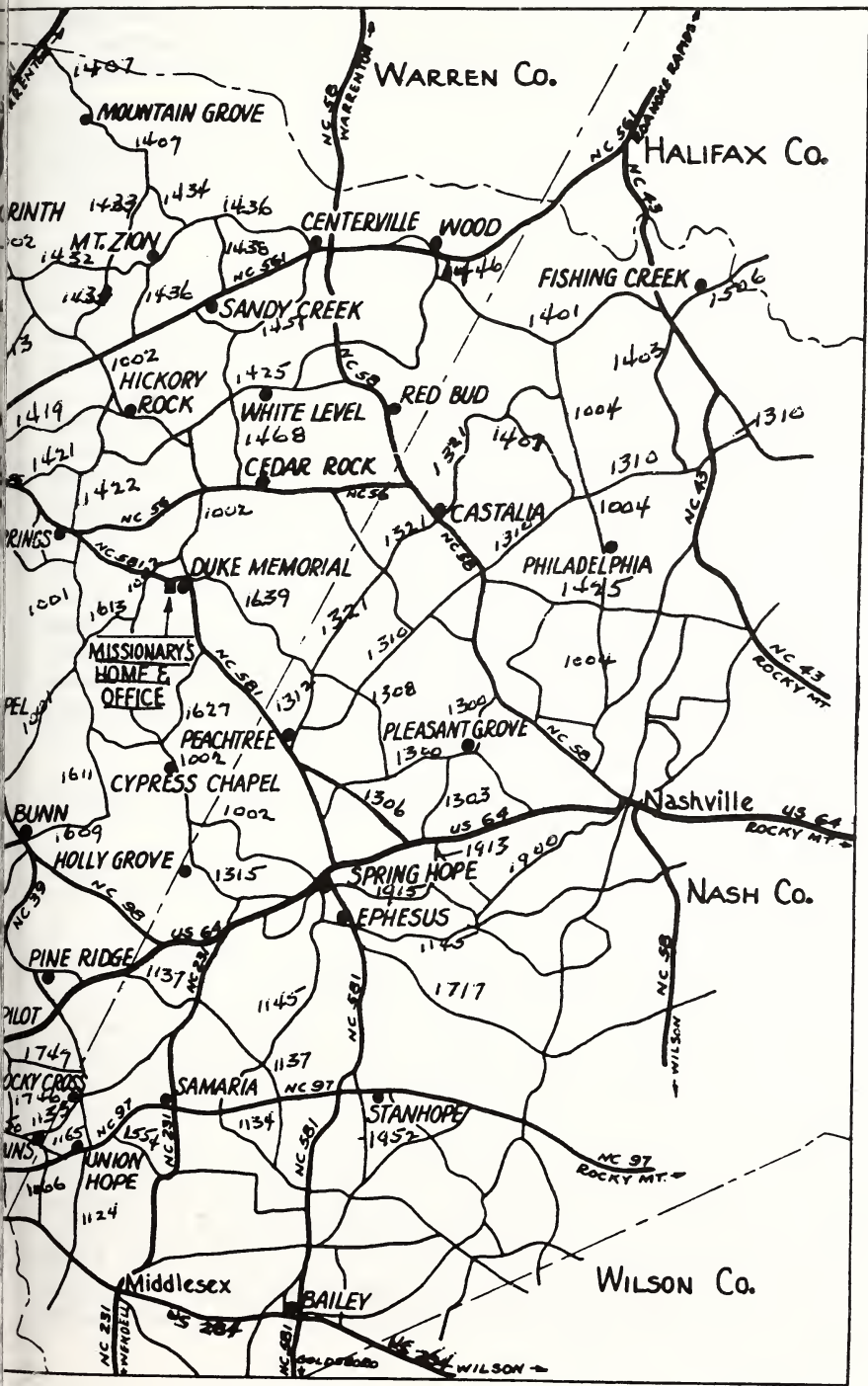

The WMU Mission work in the Tar River Baptist Association is conducted by approximately 1,482 members in 132 organizations consisting of Mission Friends, GA's, Ac-teens, Baptist Young Women, and Baptist Women. This year has been especially good with an increase in membership. We hope to gain mission opportunities in every church in our association this year. We had seven Distinguished, and one Standard organization(s). The association was also Distinguished. These churches and the association are to be com-mended for their mission commitment and accomplishments.

Ephesus Baptist Church received a plaque at the Annual State Meeting last year for ten consecutive years of being a Distinguished organization. This was the second church to receive this award in the Tar River Baptist Association. Other churches are close to this award. We envision many more striving to do God's will as they serve in Woman's Mis-sionary Union and offer spiritual gifts to God and His church. Each member can make a difference.

The Tasks of the Woman's Missionary Union is to teach missions, to engage in mission action and personal witnessing, and to give and pray for the mission work in our churches, association, state, and nation.

The Tar River WMU Council is made up of ten women trained by the State leaders. These ladies then offer training for each age-level leader, Mission Action/Personal Wit-nessing Directors, and Enlistment and Enlargement Directors in the local churches. The Fall Workshop was held on September 7, 1993, at Flat Rock Baptist Church with seventy-four attending.

The WMU Spring Meeting was held at Social Plains Baptist Church on April 5, 1993 with 157 attending. Thirty churches and one mission were represented. Tom Jenkins, Direc-tor of the Missions Division of the Baptist State Convention, was guest speaker. A Pas-tor's Recognition and Appreciation Banquet was held with most of the pastors attending.

The churches reported many mission action projects meeting needs in their areas. Gifts were collected and delivered to the inmates at the NC Correctional Center for Christmas. Gifts were collected for the Christmas Toy Store Ministry, and witnessing was rendered to the unsaved during their visit to the stores in Louisburg and Spring Hope.

Plans are complete for the Women's Day of Prayer to be held at Union Chapel Baptist Church on November 7, 1993.

Plans are being made for the Tar River Baptist Association WMU to join the North Roanoke Baptist Association WMU in giving Christmas gifts and fruit to the inmates at the Fountain Correctional Center for Women in Rocky Mount.

The Tar River WMU Council members are very mission-minded and are excited to participate in the growth of WMU work in all churches. Having age-level organizations in your church can make a difference in the spirituality and mission-mindedness of all the people.

## Historian's Report

### Outstanding Achievements for 1992-93

- BAILEY:** Seven new members were baptized. We started an "After School" Program for children K-6 grade.
- BETHLEHEM:** New members to our church include eleven by baptism and five by letter. A Minister of Youth was added to our staff. A good VBS was conducted with a record offering received for Foreign Missions. We participated in the Tar River Baptist Association Christmas Toy Store Ministry.
- BUNN:** We ordained John Hopkins.
- CASTALIA:** We had a dedication service for a newly completed fellowship hall.
- CEDAR ROCK:** The church compiled a new Church Directory. New doors with dead bolts locks and thermostats with timers were installed. The church members voted to purchase fifteen double windows and three single windows for the educational building. A playground for the children was built in the church yard. We received two members by profession of faith and one by letter.
- CENTERVILLE:** We installed a new heating and cooling system in the parsonage, a new range and a refrigerator in the church kitchen, and new flood lighting in the church yard. We remodeled the church bathrooms. New furniture was given for the vestibule in memory of Mrs. Lilla Lanier Griffin. One hundred thirty new hymnals were given in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Dunham Griffin.
- COMMUNITY:** We were given land and a building. A deacon board was established. Plans for a new building have been approved. We are getting ready for the new year.
- CORINTH:** We made a sizable contribution to the relief fund for victims of Hurricane Andrew. We also made donations to Southeastern Seminary, Epson Rescue Service, and Louisburg Rescue Service. We purchased a copy machine for the church office and new collars for choir robes. We installed vinyl siding on needed areas of the parsonage. We participated in community missions by love offerings to several needy families.
- FRANKLINTON:** We held a Sunday School Growth Revival. We participated in the Associational Toy Store Ministry. - MAPLE SPRINGS:** We had a "Hanging of the Greens" Christmas Candlelight Communion Service. Two baby dedication services were held. The youth went on a retreat to Caswell. A Brotherhood Program was started. We helped with "Care and Share" Ministry. High attendance day was held in Sunday School. We hosted the fall Tar River WMU Retreat, and co-hosted the Tar River Semi-Annual Meeting in April. We celebrated 200 years, homecoming, and revival in September with Rev. Tom Lolley preaching.
- MOUNTAIN GROVE:** New light fixtures were installed in the sanctuary. We painted the basement Sunday School rooms.
- MOUNT ZION:** Renovations were made as follows: painted doors and hardware in sanctuary, carpeted the assembly room and halls, tiled the bathrooms, and put special carpet in the vestibule. - ROCK SPRING:** We have completed the new educational building. The youth went on a mission trip to New York.
- ROCKY CROSS:** We installed a new sign in front of the church. We added brass door plates to all the doors. We bought pew Bibles. A pictorial directory was published.
- SAMARIA:** We observed the 169th anniversary and homecoming. Six new members have been added. Mr. Greg Sanders was ordained as deacon. A church pictorial directory was made. We purchased new handbells, and organized a handbell choir. New choir robes were purchased. A Mission Development Council has been organized. We have established a youth council, and started many special activities for the youth. Tapes of the worship service are being carried to the homebound. Homes of the homebound have been winterized.
- SANDY CREEK:** On "WMU Focus Day," the ladies led all aspects of the Sunday School and Morning Worship Service. Thirty men and women met for the Foreign Mission Study. The Acteen Activators went on a mission trip to Cherokee, NC. Five different groups are taking the study course "Experiencing God." We participated in the PACT Study.
- SIMS:** We have purchased and paid for an acre of land on which we will soon erect a new church building.
- SPRING HOPE:** Three youth participated in Youth Bible Drills at our church on April 11, 1993, at Temple Baptist Church in Raleigh, on April 17, 1993, and at the State Bible Drill in Boone on April 23, 1993. We are very proud of Eddie Earp, Tiffany Earp, and Crystal Edwards.
- STANHOPE:** New choir robes were given in memory and honor of the Justice and Cornelia Ricks Daniel families.
- UNION CHAPEL:** We remodeled and added space to the annex.
- UNION HOPE:** Our WIN School was a huge success. We re-roofed and did minor repairs to the church and parsonage. A group of teenagers attended camp. We held a very successful Bible School with a record number in attendance.

The Finance Committee recommends that the Association adopt this basic budget in the amount of \$98,702.89 as printed above. A challenge budget for \$105,127.89 has been worked up, and if contributions are received beyond the anticipated amount, a recommendation from the Finance Committee to fund additional projects will be presented to the Associational Executive Board for their approval or rejection.

## Executive Committee Report

The Executive Committee of the Tar River Baptist Association met twice since the semi-annual meeting in April.

June 28, 1993

The meeting was called to order, and Rev. Bill Wallace led the opening hymn.

Rev. Jimmy Pulliam led in devotion and prayer.

Roll call of the churches indicated sixty-six people present, representing twenty-nine churches.

Minutes of the March 29, 1993, meeting were read and approved.

After recognitions were made, Mr. Epp Catlett was appointed Parliamentarian.

The new WMU Council Director, Mrs. Lottie Lou Dickens, reported that 157 people, representing thirty churches, attended the annual WMU Spring Meeting at Social Plains on April 5. Sixty people attended the GA Mother Daughter Banquet at Pilot on May 15.

Announcements were made by Council Directors and the DOM as follows:

Brotherhood Training at Caswell, August 13-14.

Each church needs to register its Brotherhood each year.

Associational Sunday School Training School, September 16-17.

Bible Drill Training, Spring Hope Baptist Church, September 2.

Associational Hymn Sing, Ephesus Baptist Church, August 29.

Mrs. Peggy Earp reported that Tiffany Earp, Eddie Earp, and Crystal Edwards from Spring Hope participated in Bible Drill competition at Boone.

Rev. Jody Griffin encouraged involvement in Bible Drills.

Finance Committee Chairman Bill Spruill presented the May 1993 financial report.

Rev. Jack Watson reported that average attendance at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads had been twenty in April, twenty-eight in May, and fifty in June. The medical bus was at the mission on June 5. The Tri-County dentist is at the mission once a month. Eric Thompson is leading a film ministry in sixteen different migrant camps. June 27, was the second anniversary homecoming service at the mission. Eighty-seven people attended the service; nine accepted the Lord; and seven to eight dedicated themselves to the success of the mission. Rev. Watson presented Rev. Wallace a certificate of appreciation.

Rev. Wallace, on behalf of the Associational Council, presented two recommendations:

(1) That the Tar River Baptist Association enter into a partnership with the Hudson Baptist Association of New York.

(2) That the Trustees be authorized to make disposition of the bus that is no longer needed for the Hispanic work at Strickland's Crossroads.

Motions were made to accept the recommendations, and seconded; the votes carried.

Rev. Wallace introduced the Praxis Team, Mr. Keith Kimball and Mr. Carl Kolb. The team reported that they had knocked on about 326 doors within five major subdivisions, the perimeter area, and some dirt roads. They had found that approximately 95% of the people surveyed had at one time been involved in church. Many needs have been discovered that the churches could address.

Rev. Wallace gave his Director of Missions' Report.

After prayer requests were made, the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Mr. Wayne Gupton.

### September 27, 1993

The meeting was called to order. After an opening hymn, Rev. Bill Wallace led in a devotion and prayer.

Roll call of the churches indicated forty-one people present, representing nineteen churches.

The minutes of the June 28, 1993 meeting were read and approved.

After recognitions were made, Rev. Gary McNair was appointed as Parliamentarian.

The WMU Council, Mrs. Lottie Lou Dickens reported that the WMU Executive Board had been busy meeting, making plans, and attending the State Workshop at Clinton. She reported that seventy-four had attended the Fall Workshop on September 7. She announced that plans are being made to join the North Roanoke Association WMU in preparing gift boxes for the Fountain Correctional Center for Women in Rocky Mount and to help with the Toy Store Ministry. Woman's Day of Prayer will be held at Union Chapel Baptist Church on November 7.

Finance Committee Chairman Mr. Bill Spruill presented the proposed 1994 budget, and made a motion that it be adopted. The motion was seconded, and the vote carried.

Music Council Director Miss Nanette Warren reported that 215 had attended the Associational Hymn Sing. She announced that Christmas Caroling was planned for nursing homes and the hospital in Louisburg.

Treasurer Sam Wood presented the August Financial report.

Eric Thompson, Pastor for the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads, reported that average attendance at the mission had been as follows: forty-seven in July, thirty-

three in August, and thirty-four in September. Six people were baptized on September 27. Groups from Texas and Wake Crossroads did VBS for the migrants over the summer. A sports tournament had been held over the summer with over 200 people either playing or watching. Since the mission started, many people have been saved: twenty-nine during the summer of '93, twenty-one during the summer of '92 and twenty-five during the summer of '91. Mr. Thompson concluded his report by announcing his resignation, effective December 31, 1993. He is going to South America to continue his ministry.

Rev. Wallace reported that the property in Justice was sold, with the closing on September 3. The association netted \$50,907.00 which had been deposited in the association's building fund.

The program for the annual meeting and the tentative calendar for 1994 was presented.

Rev. Wallace gave his Director of Missions report and made a recommendation that the association take the necessary steps to become incorporated. A motion was made, seconded, and the vote carried.

Youth Revival sponsored by Duke Memorial, June 20-26, 1994

The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Mr. Richard Morgan.

Chris starts college at North Carolina State this fall on a football scholarship. After leading Thomasville to a state championship in 1991, Chris also earned national honor society recognition, was active in the community counseling drug abusers...and became a Christian at Mills Home.

Kathy married a Christian young man who was a volunteer at Broyhill Home, where she lived. She continues her education at Haywood Technical College while working and becoming a young wife. She and her husband, Kris, are members at Woodland Baptist Church, where she was active in leading children's programs, even as a Broyhill resident.

Several rows of supportive staff members cried during the wedding when the minister asked, "Who gives this woman to be married?" Child care worker Jim Johnson responded, "Her mother and I do."

"Her mother," was Jim's wife, Vivian. Together, Jim and Vivian helped Kathy develop from an angry and withdrawn child, to a beautiful, confident Christian leader.

Ashley was growing up too fast...and her parents didn't know how to handle it. They wanted to treat her like a child; she wanted adult freedoms. When their constant clashing came to blows, they knew they needed help.

Through the family clarification program at Mills Home, both Ashley and her parents learned the roles they played in the family conflict, and how to listen, forgive and adjust in the future.

"We're very grateful to Baptist Children's Homes," said Ashley's mother, Victoria. "I don't know what we would have done. I don't know what would have happened to Ashley. I've had friends say to me, 'I never knew there was a place like that.'"

Well, there is a place like that.

Thank God.

Baptist Children's Homes in 1992-93 served 1,453 children and their families through programs of intentionalized services at 13 facilities across North Carolina.

Those facilities include four residential care campuses; seven emergency care homes; two homes for behaviorally troubled girls; therapeutic camping for boys; a maternity home; a home for teenage mothers and their babies and a model daycare facility.

Baptist Churches, through the Thanksgiving Offering, Cooperative Program and direct gifts funded about one-third of BCH's \$10 million budget. A significant source of income continues to be from estate gifts from those who remember children in their wills.

BCH's model daycare service took a giant step June 27 when the new \$1 million, 10,000 sq. ft. Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center was dedicated. It will accommodate 75 infants, toddlers and two-year olds.

During dedication, Robin Britt, N.C. Secretary of the NC Department of Human Resources, said BCH is "a true model of how young children can be shaped, nurtured and loved," and that "we will be looking at institutions like the Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center as we find models to replicate."

T. Winfield Blackwell, president of the Fleshman-Pratt Foundation, whose lead gift started construction of the building, said, "Think how many children will be raised and shaped by the dedicated staff who serve here, and surely a goodly number will be developed, not only to be good citizens, but active ministers in God's service."

BCH also dedicated a counselor's lodge at Cameron Boys Camp; completed a strategic planning cycle for the next three years; celebrated the 50th Anniversary of Odum House in Pembroke; completed a three-year partnership with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil; and produced a new video about BCH, available August 15.

Swelling with emotion at the dedication of her new building, Daycare Services Director Mary Lou Dickey promised, "we will not fail" those who trust BCH with their children.

Michael C. Blackwell, who celebrated his 10th anniversary as president of BCH July 1, echoes that promise. "Baptist Children's Homes has been a cutting-edge ministry for North Carolina Baptists since 1885. As a disintegrating society moves the edges further and further, we're honing our ministry sharper and sharper. Thank you, North Carolina Baptists, for your support."

## **1993: The Best of Times**

Did you know that:

In 1993, North Carolina reached place number ten (10) among all states in the United States in regard to the size of its adult population over the age of sixty-five (65).

That one-half of all the people who have ever lived to be sixty-five (65) are now living.

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life is composed of those adults eighty-five (85) and older and that by the year 2000 that age category will double in size.

That by the year 1996 North Carolina's "Baby Boomers" will be turning fifty-five (55) every 18 seconds.

That by the year 2010 one out of every two people living in North Carolina will be fifty (50) years of age or older?

What do figures like those above mean for North Carolina Baptists?

They point to the fact that one of the greatest needs facing our Convention as we move into the year 2000 is the provision of quality, affordable long-term care services to func-

tionally impaired Older Adults through the expansion of existing long-term care facilities, and through the development of creative approaches to long-term care such as rural home health services, community day care programs, and respite programs for homebound care providers.

In an attempt to meet the above mentioned need, Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. in 1993:

Opened the Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville, North Carolina (a 100 bed Medicaid certified nursing care facility).

The Rickman Center is a state-of-the-art long-term care facility that has been developed to meet the needs of the poor elderly in Western North Carolina. (80% of the resident population will be recipients of benevolent funding).

Renovated the Albemarle Baptist Home in Stanly Baptist Association and renamed it the Taylor House. The Taylor House has no financial requirements for admission and is designed to provide care to the assisted living level of care resident, regardless of his/her ability to pay for the long-term care services provided.

Developed a new addition to the Brookridge Health Care Unit in Winston-Salem in order to provide an area for small group work with residents suffering from dementia. This state-of-the-art program will enable Baptist Retirement Homes' staff to improve the quality of life experienced by members of its resident community who are mentally impaired.

Baptist Retirement Homes is keenly aware of the fact that without the support of North Carolina Baptists none of the above would have been possible. As a result of the prayers and funding that the "Homes" receives through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Offering For Older Adults, it has been able to offer hope to many Older Adults whose future would have been uncertain without the caring involvement of North Carolina Baptists. ## **North Carolina Baptist Hospital**

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report, not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care at affordable prices.

### **PROVIDERS AND RECIPIENTS OF HEALING**

Our healing team now consists of 5,852 employees. The Medical Center (NCBH and BGSMD) personnel total employment is fast approaching 9,000 people making us the second largest employer in Forsyth County. In our 806-bed facility, we had 23,247 inpatient admissions. Our Outpatient Department, physicians' clinics, and other related departments received 490,667 patient visits.

Our chaplaincy division joined with our health-care professionals to provide spiritual and emotional healing. With 15-40 chaplains present at various times, 52,934 ministries were provided to patients, families, staff and groups.

- (6) Our Level 1 (highest awarded) Trauma Center has 2,100 admissions a year.

(1) The latest report of the North Carolina Database Commission comparing hospital major services charges vs. Baptist Hospital reveals, for our most frequent diagnoses:

(2) We are one of only 17 similar hospitals nationally with a "AA" bond credit rating.

## EXPANSION FOR MEETING THE NEEDS OF THE FUTURE

### Nursing Center at Oak Summit

Opening in July, this 170-bed facility provides skilled and intermediate care. The center will be one of only a few in the state to provide care for ventilator-dependent patients.

### Emergency Department/Dietary

Under construction at the present time to be completed by June 1995, this facility will total 750,000 square feet. Our current ER was designed to handle 29,000 patients annually, but it is handling more than 40,000. Our new ER capacity will be 70,000 annually. This building will also house three floors of patient private rooms, our Pharmacy Department, and a 35-bed Day Hospital, new kitchen and cafeteria.

## **J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation**

Construction on this facility begins in November of 1993 and is scheduled for completion in January 1996. It will include geriatric care, research, and education; psychiatry; and also provide comprehensive acute rehabilitation services including nutrition assessment, physical, outpatient, speech, and recreational therapy.

## **BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND**

Last year Baptists across our state gave \$422,000 to our annual Mother's Day Offering. All of these monies went toward relieving the financial burden of scores of former patients who have little or no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. The churches and individuals help make this ministry possible and we are grateful.

In conclusion, it is readily seen that this healing ministry we share together says to our patients and their families:

“We care about your health-care needs, your spiritual and emotional needs, and your financial burdens, and we express our caring through service.”

## **Christian Action League**

Report to the Associations 1993

Do you believe in miracles? They still occur, and we experienced one again in the 1993 session of the N.C. General Assembly. No gambling legislation was enacted during that legislative session.

When the legislators came to Raleigh on January 27, 1993, veteran legislative observ-



ers admitted that this was the year for a state-operated lottery bill to get out of the General Assembly. Governor James B. Hunt and Lt. Governor Dennis Wicker, both former lottery opponents, had endorsed the proposed lottery legislation. Furthermore, there were 42 new House members, and a large majority of them had campaigned supporting the lottery. Out of the key elected state officials, gambling opponents had only one friend, House Speaker Dan Blue, and he made no apologies about his opposition to state-sponsored gambling.

What happened? Concerned Christians began to speak up and contacted their legislators. By the time, Senate Bill 11, The State Lottery Act, had passed the Senate by a vote of 27-23, House members who had campaigned supporting lottery legislation began contacting members of the House Committee on Constitutional Amendments and Referenda to keep the bill in committee.

In the meantime, some 20 workshops were conducted throughout the state educating and motivating the Christian community about this insidious evil under the sponsorship of the League, N.C. Baptist Men, Woman's Missionary Union, the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs, and the N.C. Christian Coalition. Resource leaders included Dr. Norman Geisler, author, *Gambling a Bad Bet*; Dr. Patrick Anderson, professor of Criminology, Florida Southern College; Dr. Paul Jones, Executive Director, Mississippi Christian Action Commission; Bill Brooks, Executive Director, CITIZENS AGAINST THE LOTTERY; from the Baptist State Convention, Doug Cole, Executive Director, Christian Life Council; along with George Reed, Director of Christian Citizenship; and members of Gamblers Anonymous.

In the closing days of the legislative session, Rep. David Redwine, (D-Brunswick), who has introduced lottery legislation for the past 10 years, requested that the bill be held over until the 1994 session.

Of course, this will give the \$300 billion gambling industry some 10 months to re-group their supporters. Also it will give concerned Christians the time to get their message to lawmakers that gambling is bad public policy, and such legislation ought to be defeated.

There is also a pari-mutuel gambling proposal (horse racing with off-track betting parlors) before the General Assembly. The Senate Bill has already passed a Senate Committee and is currently in the Senate Finance Committee. The House Bill has also passed a House Committee and is currently in the House Appropriations Committee. Both bills are eligible for the 1994 session.

Someone has said: "The only lesson we learn from history is that we don't learn from history." North Carolina had an experience with pari-mutuel gambling with dog tracks in Currituck and Carteret counties in the early 1950's. The N.C. Supreme Court closed them down as being a public nuisance.

Perhaps there is no industry that is "riddled" with corruption as much as the gambling industry. Last year we had legislators indicted in S.C. for accepting bribes from gambling lobbyists. Some 10 public officials have pled guilty to corruption charges in Kentucky over a gambling "scam," and 12 others are under investigation. In Arizona, legislators have gone to prison due to a gambling scandal. We have had Governors from West Virginia and from Maryland to go to prison due to gambling scandals in their respective states. Wherever you have legalized gambling, undoubtedly, you will find corruption in government.

This is why it is urgent for committed Christians to contact their legislators and urge them to oppose any gambling proposals.

**DRUNK DRIVING:** When you deal with politicians, tenacity is a key. For ten years, we have sought legislation that would establish .08 breathalyzer reading as the standard

for drunk driving in North Carolina. In the past, we were able to get such legislation through the House, but the Senate was the graveyard. The measure would always be referred to a hostile Senate Committee composed largely of trial lawyers, and that would be "death" to such a proposal.

With a change in Senate leadership, the .08 breathalyzer legislation will become law on October 1, 1993, which will be a useful tool in helping to remove drunk drivers from the highways.

The League continues to assist local communities in combating our No. 1 drug problem, alcohol. Let us know if a liquor referendum is to be held in your area, and we will be ready to help.

## **North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc.**

Annual Report to Baptist Associations of North Carolina  
June 1993

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation works diligently in service to Christ as directed by the agency's Mission Statement:

"The North Carolina Baptist Foundation is an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina committed under the guidance of the Holy Spirit to serving North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions mission endeavors on a permanent basis.

And further, the Baptist Foundation Staff and Board of Directors are committed to being scrupulously moral, legal, efficient and accurate in carrying out the intent of each donor and trustor whose funds are placed under management of the Foundation as a means of sustaining a tangible and perpetual involvement in presenting the Gospel, meeting human needs and strengthening all bodies of Christian fellowship where Christ is the Head."

The total market value of the assets of the Foundation at the end of 1992 was \$41,880,638., an increase of almost \$5.6 million over the end of 1991. Typically, assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes, or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income to be paid to Baptist causes in perpetuity. Additionally, the Foundation offers fund management for Baptist causes on a revocable basis.

Earned income distributed and paid  
to individuals (with Baptist causes named  
as future beneficiaries) during the fiscal  
year 1992: \$1,024,007.00

In 1992, and continuing into 1993, the Long Range Planning Committee of the Board of Directors met extensively to lay the groundwork for the Foundation's goals and objec-

tives for the next five years. The previous five years were quite successful with ambitious financial goals being met early on. It is anticipated that the Board's work in evaluating the past and present status and in laying a road map for the future will result in exciting times ahead.

The staff of the Foundation consists of seven full-time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. The office is located in Cary next to the Baptist State Convention building. Visitors are welcome and are encouraged to stop by for professional assistance or just to say hello.

## Home Mission Board, SBC

### 1992 Annual Report

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). Headquartered in Atlanta, GA, the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

At the end of last year, 4,868 missions personnel were serving in the United States, the Caribbean, American Samoa, and Canada. The HMB also had endorsed more than 2,200 chaplains who were serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. More than 2,400 Mission Service Corps volunteers were serving on home mission fields. During the year there were 367,847 baptisms and 1,281 church starts.

Approximately half the HMB's support comes from individual SBC churches through the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1992, gifts to the offering totaled \$37.61 million, up almost 6 percent from the 1991 total. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1993 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$38 million. About 36 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

Home missions is a partnership of the HMB, state conventions, associations, and churches. The HMB's strategy is to help start churches, ministry endeavors, and evangelism efforts that will grow to self-support or be carried on by local churches or association.

The following is a summary of program/support ministry highlights from 1992:

**Chaplaincy Ministries:** The 2,293 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported 24,000 professions of faith and 4,600 baptisms.

**Alternatives to Abortion:** Workers in 23 crisis pregnancy center received training from the HMB. As a result of the ministry of these centers, 2,164 babies were born and 832 women found faith in Christ.

**Church Loans:** More than 1,100 churches had active loans totaling \$115 million. These loans purchased, refinanced, remodeled, or constructed 106 buildings and purchased 9 building sites.

**Language Missions:** Home missionaries and pastors in the Language Church Extension Division serve among 102 ethnic groups using 98 languages and dialects.

**Personal Evangelism:** During the Southern Baptist Convention in Indianapolis, 1,353 volunteers canvassed 45,235 residences, conducted a religious survey, and shared the gospel with 2,905 individuals, 361 of whom made professions of faith.

**Prayer and Spiritual Awakening:** A national team began efforts to enhance effective prayer and revival ministries in churches. The Intercessory Prayerline grew from 7,500 calls in 1985 to 130,000 last year.

**Volunteers:** Over 71,000 Southern Baptist adults, college students, and youth group members volunteered for long and short term projects. More than 58,000 volunteers responded to disaster relief efforts in Florida, Louisiana, and Hawaii.

**Special Ministries:** Southern Baptists minister to seamen in 37 port cities and 200 missionaries are involved in ministries related to college students, resorts, special events, and diplomats.
