BYLAWS

PREAMBLE

For the declaration of its fundamental purposes and the permanent guidance and control of its activities, this body does adopt the following as its Bylaws, to wit:

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Corporation to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches; and to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Corporation.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. There shall be two (2) classes of membership in the Corporation: voting and non-voting. The non-voting membership shall be composed of all of the members of the churches affiliated with the Corporation. Voting members of the Corporation shall be known as messengers and shall be elected annually by each of the individual churches affiliated with the Corporation in accordance with the following schedule: Each church is entitled to four (4) messengers. Any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred (200) is entitled to two (2) additional messengers per one hundred (100) members (or major fraction thereof) in excess of two hundred (200). No church shall be entitled to more than ten (10) messengers.

SECTION 2. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Corporation

shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The Corporation shall meet bi-annually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session.

ARTICLE IV - RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE CORPORATION

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Corporation by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator and the Director of Missions shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES OF THE CORPORATION

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Corporation by filing the Annual Church Profile; to send messengers to the bi-annual meetings of the Corporation; to give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Corporation. The Corporation secretary (known as the Clerk) shall furnish the churches with the necessary printed forms and/or software for their Annual Church Profiles. These materials are to be distributed to the churches at least six (6) weeks before the Annual Fall session of the Corporation. The churches are requested to have the Church Profiles in the hands of the Clerk not less than two weeks before the fall meeting of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE CORPORATION
SECTION 1. The Corporation shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty
of rights of churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of

appeals. It may advise the churches and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

SECTION 2. The Corporation may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that treats with contempt the purposes and requirements of the Corporation, or that applies for its own dismissal. The Corporation may also dissolve connection with any church that does not file a Church Profile or have messengers attending its Annual Fall Meetings for two (2) consecutive years.

ARTICLE VII - OFFICERS

The officers of the Corporation shall be: Director of Missions, Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Trustees.

ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to lead the Corporation to fulfill its mission faithfully, effectively, and lovingly. His role is three-dimensional: (1) mission strategist, (2) minister to the churches, pastors, and other church staff members, and (3) general leader of the Corporation. Within the limits of his time and ability, he is to respond to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Corporation.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Clerk (also known as the Secretary) to provide administrative support services to the Director of Missions and to the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. It shall also be the duty of the Clerk to record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the bi-annual meetings and of the Executive Board, and to make this information available on request. The Clerk shall use all diligence to have the record of transactions printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible; and to distribute to the church clerks reminders about, and forms for, the Annual Church Profile. The Clerk shall also serve as ex-officio Secretary of the Executive Board.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to plan for and preside over the bi-annual and called meetings of the Corporation and the quarterly Executive Board meetings, and to encourage fellowship and mutual care among the churches. He shall open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. The Moderator shall appoint a Parliamentarian to serve at each meeting of the Corporation and the Executive Board Meetings. He shall also serve as ex-officio chairman of the Executive Board. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two (2) one-year terms in succession.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to assist in developing fellowship and mutual care among the churches and church leaders. He shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in the Moderator's absence, serve as vice-chairman of the Executive Board, and serve as Chairman of the Executive Council.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to assist in receiving, accounting, and disbursing of all the Corporation's monies as authorized by the Corporation or the Executive Board. By virtue of his office the Treasurer shall be an ex officio member of the Finance Committee.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to act as the legal agents of the Corporation and shall hold title of all property of the Corporation. In the name of the Corporation they shall be authorized and empowered to receive title to real and personal property, and to sell and convey or mortgage same upon authority duly given by the Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. They are also responsible for keeping an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Corporation, a copy of which is to be kept on file in the Corporation's Office. The Trustees are to be three (3) in number, and they are to serve for a term of three (3) years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

The Committees of the Corporation are administrative in nature. These administrative Committees are as follows: Nominating; Credentials; Finance; Resolutions; Time, Place, and Preacher; Program; Bylaws; Christian Education; Strategy;

Properties; History; and others deemed necessary or desirable. Each Committee shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. Committee members shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin immediately upon the adjournment of the Annual Fall Meeting of the Corporation. Members are allowed to serve more than one term in succession.

ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose SECTION 1. duty it will be to nominate all officers, leaders, committeemen, and council representatives with the exception of the Director of Missions, the Clerk, and any This committee is to be appointed by the Moderator, and shall other paid employees. retain at least two (2) of its members from the preceding year.

The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose SECTION 2. duty it will be to assist the Corporation in determining when churches are of like faith and order, and when they can be properly accepted in the fellowship of the Corporation. It is also the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the

Corporation as voting members of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in securing, administering, and reporting its finances. This committee will plan and propose an annual budget to the Executive Board and suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. This committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. At least two (2) of its members shall be retained from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as an ex-officio member of this committee.

SECTION 4. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in studying resolutions for adoption by the Corporation or the Executive Board. This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Corporation's feelings in regard to the bi-annual meetings,

officers of the Corporation, host churches, and other matters.

SECTION 5. The TIME, PLACE, and PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place, and preacher for the bi-annual

meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Corporation and the host pastors of the bi-annual meetings. It shall be their duty to assist the Corporation in planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Corporation. They shall receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form for the bi-annual meetings which, upon the adoption by the Corporation, shall become its order of business.

SECTION 7. The BYLAWS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to make recommendations relative to Bylaw changes. This Committee shall receive all proposed changes and/or amendments to the Bylaws of the Tar River Baptist

Association, Inc., and upon study of said changes and/or amendments make

recommendations to the Corporation concerning said changes and/or amendments. SECTION 8. The CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to keep before the churches of the Corporation all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

SECTION 9. The STRATEGY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in determining strategic objectives and

staying on course in achieving them.

SECTION 10. The PROPERTIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in properties administration. Committee shall develop and recommend policies and procedures for using the Corporation's facilities and equipment.

SECTION 11. The HISTORY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the

Corporation's life and work.

ARTICLE XI - INSTITUTIONAL AND AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES

The Denomination's Institutional and Agency Representatives shall include the following: Annuity Board, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes, Christian Higher Education, Religious Literature, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Mission. The representatives for these institutions and agencies shall be responsible for providing information to the churches during the year, and/or giving reports on the work of the institutions and agencies at the bi-annual meetings of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XII - MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

The Mission Performance Councils undergird and give support to the work of program related ministries of the Corporation. Training leadership shall be a primary responsibility of these Councils. All Mission Performance Councils shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. These Mission Performance Councils are as follows: Seminary Extension, Ordination Advisory, Music, Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Vacation Bible School, Recreation, Media Library, Pastoral Ministries, Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions Development, Youth Ministry, and Family Ministry.

ARTICLE XIII - DUTIES OF THE MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS SECTION 1. The SEMINARY EXTENSION COUNCIL shall direct any Seminary Extension Program for the churches affiliated with the Corporation. This Council shall be composed of at least (5) members.

SECTION 2. The ORDINATION ADVISORY COUNCIL shall be composed of at least (5) members. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to act only in an advisory capacity for churches seeking assistance in examining prospective candidates approved for ordination. This Council shall conduct its work within the guidelines of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The MUSIC COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. This Council shall plan and implement the music program of the Corporation. They shall recommend to the Program Committee the music for the bi-annual meetings, and they shall

enlist accompanists for all Corporation Meetings.

SECTION 4. The SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of the ASSISTeam to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate Sunday School Work.

SECTION 5. The DISCIPLESHIP SUPPORT TEAM shall be composed of at least two (2) members and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of this team to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the total Discipleship Ministry of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION shall consist of the leadership recommended by the WMU Nominating Committee and elected by the Corporation's WMU. This Council will have the responsibility of planning, promoting, conducting, and evaluating WMU work.

SECTION 7. The BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL shall be composed of the officers of the Corporation's Brotherhood. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the work of Baptist Men and also the work of Royal Ambassadors.

SECTION 8. The VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. The Vacation Bible School Council Director is the leader of the VBS Team and shall plan and promote the Corporation's VBS Clinics. The age-group VBS leaders who

comprise this team shall be responsible for conducting the VBS Clinics.

SECTION 9. The RECREATION COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members whose duty it shall be to help plan, coordinate, promote, and conduct the entire recreation program of the Corporation. They shall be available to assist any entity of the Corporation with the planning and conducting of recreational activities. The work of this Council includes setting up and supervising the Basketball Program, and any other Sports Program that may be started. This Council will also plan, promote, and conduct the Annual Royal Ambassador Track Meet, and the Annual Royal Ambassador Car Competition.

SECTION 10. The MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL shall consist of at least three (3) members. This Church Media Library Organization is often referred to as TACMO. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to provide for the mutual sharing of inspiration and information for furthering the Church Media Center Ministry of the

affiliated churches.

SECTION 11. The PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL shall be composed of the following: (1) Pastoral Ministries Director, (2) Church Administration Services Coordinator, (3) Deacon Ministry Coordinator, (4) Vocational Guidance Coordinator, and (5) Church Weekday Education Coordinator, and any others that may be deemed necessary or advisable. The duties of this Council shall be to determine the pastoral ministries emphasis needed or desired and to schedule the events in cooperation with the total

programming of the Corporation. The major task of the Council shall be the development and training of ministers through conferences, workshops, clinics, awareness meetings,

retreats, and ministry support groups.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. It shall be the duty of this Council to plan and promote any evangelism programs, training projects, and rallies needed or desired. It shall also be the responsibility of this Council to keep evangelism before the pastors and laypeople of the Corporation.

SECTION 13. The STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall

be responsible for stewardship development and promotion within or among the churches of the Corporation. It will be the task of this Council to seek to lead the churches

to set specific, attainable, measurable stewardship goals.

SECTION 14. The MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall consist of at least seven (7) members. This Council shall be responsible for missions development in the total program of the Corporation. The Council shall not only be concerned with already established missions, mission work, and mission activities; it shall be concerned with beginning new mission work. It will be their responsibility to study the missionary needs of the Corporation and make recommendations concerning new work. They shall also recommend missions projects or activities with which the churches in the Corporation may cooperate. They shall strive to get each church in the Corporation to elect or appoint a Church Mission Development Council.

SECTION 15 The YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least (5) members, shall be responsible for planning youth related ministries for the Corporation including

retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

SECTION 16. The FAMILY MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be-responsible for helping to plan, promote, and conduct any program emphasis related to family life. This Council should strive to include the needs of senior adults, single adults, marriage partners, parents, and children.

ARTICLE XIV - THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Executive Council shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, the Directors of the various Program Councils, and three members at large. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to assist the Director of Missions in planning, coordinating, promoting, and executing the Corporation's Programs, making recommendations to the Executive Board or to the Corporation in its Annual Fall Meeting. It shall also be the duty of this Council to plan the annual calendar. This Council shall meet quarterly on another Monday evening prior to each Executive Board meeting, and at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or Moderator.

ARTICLE XV - THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Corporation Officers and key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Pastor, Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Board Members shall be members of the church they represent. If a church does not have one or more of these leaders, it may appoint a substitute for each vacancy and shall submit the name/names with the church profile.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall meet quarterly usually during March, June, September, and November on Monday night following the fourth Sunday of the month unless a conflict necessitates moving the meeting to Monday after the third or fifth Sunday. The Executive Board may meet at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator for the purpose of transacting special or urgent business.

SECTION 3. Although each church should earnestly strive to get its full contingent of key leaders to attend, there is no quorum requirement for transacting business at a regular or called meeting of the Executive Board.

SECTION 4. The Director of Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive

Board and does not have the power to vote.

SECTION 5. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as follows:

a. The Executive Board is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary, and to define his duties.

b. To act for the Corporation between regular sessions of the body.

c. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.

d. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.

'e. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Corporation the annual budget, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered by the Corporation.

f. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Board in the name of the Corporation shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of

the Corporation.

ARTICLE XVI - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Corporation, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XVII - AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of the Corporation's meeting. The said amendment(s) must be presented to the afternoon session and voted on no earlier than the evening session.

ARTICLE XVIII - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES

The business of the Corporation shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE XIX - BUSINESS PROCEDURE

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Corporation or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration

and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator, and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

 The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.
 Any resolution to be presented to the Executive Board and/or bi-annual meetings must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Corporation and published in the Corporation's newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

- 9. Each Fall Session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the annual sermon. Reports of committees must be brief - not exceeding five hundred words. Other 10.
- reports should not exceed three hundred words each. 11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Librarian of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina; Biblical Recorder, Raleigh, North Carolina; Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina; Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee; and State Baptist Convention.

13. The host churches of the bi-annual meetings shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words). These histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of

the Corporation.

AFTERNOON SESSION

(Note from Clerk: Some reports are not printed in the Proceedings. They are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

- 1. The 165th Semi-Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at $3:30~\mathrm{p.m.}$ by Moderator C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church. 2. After a welcome and opening comments by Dr. Pruette, Director of Missions Bill Wallace led in singing the hymn, "Let Others See Jesus In You."
- 3. Rev. Rickey Letson, Castalia Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
- Dr. Pruette organized the session, and appointed Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock
- Baptist Church, as parliamentarian. 5. Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church, presented the report of the program committee. He made a motion to adopt the program as printed with two additions: special prayer in the afternoon session for Oklahoma due to the recent bombing, and
- a report by Nanette Warren on Music and VBS to be presented in the evening session. The motion was seconded by Rev. Edwin Carroll, Peachtree Baptist Church, and the vote carried. 6. Rev. Wallace recognized the following new pastors: Stephen Brock-Loftis, Maple
- Springs; Paul Douglas, Cedar Rock; David Brooks, Centerville; Rickey Letson, Castalia; Rinehold Koschel, Mountain Grove; and David Anderson, Pleasant Grove.
- The histories of the host churches were presented by Mrs. Myrtle Hedgepeth, Castalia; Mrs. Louise May, Peachtree; and Mrs. Paulette Slcop, Philadelphia. 8. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, " Have Thine Own Way, Lord.'
- Mr. Edwin Coates presented the report of the NC Baptist Foundation. emphasized that people don't give to the Baptist Foundation, but through the Baptist Foundation. The NC Baptist Foundation is a trust agency. The Foundation holds gifts to be used for particular purposes and is supported by the Cooperative Program.
- Discipleship Supporter Wendy Edwards, Spring Hope Baptist Church, introduced 10. the Discipleship Presentation. She compared "growing" Christians to "growing" babies.
- 11. After an introduction by Discipleship Supporter Jody Griffin, Spring Hope Baptist Church, Mr. Jesse Coppage, guest soloist, presented special music. 12. Mrs. Edwards presented "Go...Make Disciples Through Mission Involvement. emphasized that in order to grow, Christians needed to be available to the Lord.
- 13. Mr. Adolphus Batchelor, Holly Grove Baptist Church, gave a testimony of how he has grown spiritually through helping others.
- 14. Mrs. Becky Trevillian, Franklinton Baptist Church, gave a testimony of how she has grown by studying "Experiencing God".
- 15. Rev. Griffin presented "Go...Make Disciples Through Books and Materials." emphasized that Christians can grow by reading books, participating in study courses, and through other discipleship processes.
- 16. Mr. Dan Leonard, White Level Baptist Church, gave testimony of how he had grown in the Lord through lay-led events.
- 17. Discipleship Supporter Stephen Brock-Loftis, Maple Springs Baptist Church, presented "Go...Make Disciples Through Growth Experiences". He emphasized that everyone has a story that should be told.
- 18. Rev. Griffin challenged everyone to "grow as you go" and then led in prayer. 19.
- Mr. Jesse Coppage presented special music.
- 20. The presentation closed with an opportunity for everyone to make discipleship commitments by writing their commitments on a specially prepared note pad. The commitments were collected and will be used by the Discipleship Supporters to plan for further discipling opportunities.

- Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, "Living for Jesus".
- Special music was presented by Rev. Luis Maravi, pastor for the Hispanic 23. Mission at Strickland's Crossroads, along with some of the people from the mission. Rev. Wallace announced that help was needed at the Sims Baptist Church in 24. building the new church building. He also made an appeal to the churches for help with building and funding the new associational building.
- Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus". Afterwards a special offering was taken for the new associational building.
- 26. Rev. Jody Griffin read scripture and led in prayer.
- Mrs. Pat Medlin, White Level Baptist Church, presented special music. The annual sermon was delivered by Rev. Gary Murry, White Level Baptist Church. 28.
- His message followed the discipleship theme of the meeting.
- 29. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Mr. Tommy Sloop, Philadelphia Baptist Church.

EVENING SESSION

- The Ladies Ensemble from the Hayes Barton Baptist Church of Raleigh presented a mini concert to open the evening session.
 - Rev. Edwin Carroll, Peachtree Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, "Take My Life and Let It Be".
- Finance Committee Chairman Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented 4. the financial report.
- Sunday School Director David Averette, Franklinton Baptist Church, presented a mini-drama, with the help of Rev. Wallace, to announce and promote the Associational Sunday School Training School which is scheduled for September. He also announced that a tape of the "Teaching with Style" seminar was available, along with the workbooks, at the associational office.
- 6. Music Council Director Nanette Warren, Pilot Baptist Church, did a dramatic comedy, with the help of Dr. Pruette, to announce and promote the VBS Clinics and the Music School to be held in May. She also announced the Children's Musical that she was trying to get together and extended an invitation for any children in the association to participate.
- Wendy Edwards, in her report, stated that the Discipleship Support team encourages discipleship efforts in the churches. She reported that at the January strategy meeting, participants brainstormed answers to the question "How can we support discipleship efforts in your church?" She also mentioned that five people are currently studying the LIFE course "Untangling Relationships." Ten children, four youth, and one speaker from Spring Hope, Sandy Creek, and Oak Grove participated in the Associational Bible Drill and Speakers' Tournament held at Sandy Coming up in the fall is an event called "Calling All Christians to Creek in April. Growth.'
- 8. WMU Council Director Lottie Lou Dickens, Ephesus Baptist Church, reported that the WMU theme for 1994-95 is "A Time to Grow". Recent mission projects include the prison ministry, Project Hunger, dress making for children in another country, the toy ministry, the Ukraine partnership, the New York partnership, the Camp Mundo Vista restoration project, and the Hispanic Ministry. The WMU Council has been visiting the churches, leading in book studies, helping with organizational programs, and speaking. The annual WMU Spring Meeting was held at Maple Springs in April. Irma Duke and Patricia Frazier were the guest speakers. We now have area directors. Plans are being made for workshops concerning the changes coming this fall. Mrs. Dickens said there was great concern for WMU nationwide, and she requested prayer. She urged people to write Irma Duke to let her know what WMU has meant to them and to their churches.
- 9. Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton, Red Bud Baptist Church, reported that the RAs held a car derby, had representation at the RA Congress, and had a track meet. The men built a storage building at the Strickland's Crossroads Hispanic Mission. Help is needed with the new building at Sims and with the new associational building.
- 10. A special offering was collected for the new Associational Center. (the total offering taken at the afternoon and evening session was \$1,391.32).
- 11. Credentials Committee Chairman Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reported the following attendance at the Spring Semi-Annual Meeting: 21 pastors, 85 messengers, 13 alternates, 14 officers, and 45 guests totaling 178 people representing 30 churches and 1 mission.
- 12. Rev. Shelby Stephens, Pilot Baptist Church, gave the following report from the Resolutions Committee:

- 15. Dr. Pruette expressed gratitude to the churches for hosting the meeting.
- 16. Rev. Wallace led in singing "Blest Be the Tie".
- The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. DuPre Sanders, Franklinton 17. Baptist Church.

THE HISTORY OF CASTALIA BAPTIST CHURCH

Castalia Baptist Church was organized in 1892 by Rev. George Duke with the following charter members: Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Bartholomew, Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Rice, Mr. and Mrs. Merritt Batchelor, and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Coppedge.

There have been four church buildings. The first two consisted of one large room each. The third contained a large auditorium with four Sunday School rooms. Later six more Sunday School rooms were added. The fourth building, the present church, consisting of a sanctuary and an educational building at the back, was built when W. J. Edwards was serving as pastor. The dedication service for the church was held on June 4, 1961. On June 13, 1965 services were held to burn the notes of the Deed of Trust for ten thousand dollars borrowed to complete the building. God had blessed in a wonderful way making it possible to build a new beautiful and adequate church building, and to have it all paid for in just a little over four years.

On October 12, 1947, the church voted to build a new parsonage on a lot given by Miss Eugenia Boone. The Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Hollowell were the first to occupy the new home, moving in on January 27, 1949. It was remodeled in the fall of 1963. A portion of the upstairs was remodeled in 1974, making a nice room or storage area.

Some of the records showed that a pastor was paid seven hundred and fifty

dollars for part time ministry in 1923.

Several things were done under the leadership of pastor L. R. Armstrong that have added to the comfort and beauty of the church facilities: a new deep well was drilled, the church building was insulated in 1970, a heating and cooling system was installed, the sanctuary was painted in 1971, a new Baptistery scene was donated, and a new roof was put on the parsonage. In the fall of 1974 a new Allen organ was installed.

Association with Pleasant Grove Baptist Church was ended in 1974, and John E. Carkeet became the first full time pastor since 1949. Under his direction the 1975 Lottie Moon Offering for Foreign Missions reached a high of seven hundred and ninety dollars, the largest sum ever given by Castalia Baptist Church. The church library was updated. On July 4, 1976, a birthday celebration was held for our nation. A

special program was presented followed by an old fashioned picnic.

In 1977, a new roof was put on the church and the WMU associational meeting was held at Castalia. The heating system in the parsonage was replaced and air conditioning was installed. New aluminum columns replaced the wooden columns on the porch. The inside of the parsonage was painted and floor coverings were added in the living and dining rooms. Storm windows were also added in 1982. The bell from the old church steeple was replaced with chimes which were donated in 1983. Protective clear glass windows were installed over the stained glass. The following year the woodwork outside the church was covered with aluminum, and new gutters were installed.

In the 1990s pew cushions and beautiful chandeliers were added to the

sanctuary.

Dr. Garland Hendricks was pastor when the church had its Centennial Celebration on Sunday, September 20, 1992. Two former pastors, Rev. John L. Edwards and Rev. Lonnie R. Armstrong took part in the program. A personal testimony was given by Rev. Harvey L. Coppedge, the only person to answer the call to ministry from this church. He was ordained to the Gospel Ministry on August 20, 1945.

A long dream became a reality on September 12, 1993, when the church held a dedication service for the Miracle Fellowship Hall.

Rev. Rickey Letson is the current pastor, having accepted the call on February

1995. He is the twenty-fourth pastor since 1920.

God has marvelously blessed and used this church in the community for the past one hundred and three years. May we dedicate ourselves to our God-given task, and seek the power of His Spirit to lead us.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM PEACHTREE HISTORY

Peachtree Missionary Baptist Church is located in Nash County three miles north of Spring Hope on North Carolina Highway 581, in the forks of the road. Peachtree is possibly the oldest Missionary Baptist Church in Nash County under continuous organization. According to L. S. Inscoe, Nash County Historian, Peachtree was known years ago as the "Mother of Churches."

The organization date of the Church is unknown. Religious minded people met with circuit riders under a bush arbor, prior to 1809. The church minutes for February 1809 indicate that it was a well established church known as the Moses Meeting House. In 1813, a new church was built at the present site at Peachtree Grove and the name changed to "Peachtree Meeting House."

The church contracted for a new building in June 1856 with Josef Edwards for This building burned in December 31, 1919, and a new weather boarded church building was erected in 1920. A log cabin was built beside the church in 1940 to serve as extra Sunday School classrooms and a recreation area.

In 1948, plans were adopted for a new brick structure. The educational building was occupied in July 1956 and the sanctuary was dedicated in October 1957. The first full time pastor was the Rev. Norman Arant (1948-1952). The church

has had many pastors, some who helped organize the Tar River Association. Some of the pastors who served on state and national levels were: Rev. Howard Ford, Gerald Motley, Ben Fisher, Wayne E. Oates, and Rexford Campbell. Ann Downey Savage was the first woman from Peachtree to serve with the Baptist State Convention 1978-1982.

Peachtree Baptist Church has enjoyed a great history!

HISTORY OF PHILADELPHIA BAPTIST CHURCH

A Missionary Baptist Church was constituted at Philadelphia Chapel, Nash County, North Carolina on the fourth Sabbath, the twenty-seventh day of March in the year of our Lord 1859. The presbyters were Elder M. Bennett, Elder R. W. Delbridge, Elder W. H. Edwards, John Harrison, Jeff Brown, W. H. Drake, Mary Brown, Temperance and Margarette Drake. The church's covenant was adopted and signed by these eight persons. The articles of faith and the rules of decorum were adopted and Elder R. W. Delbridge was called to the pastoral care of the church in May, 1859. At the end of 1859 the Lord had blessed the congregation with twenty-six new members, bringing the total membership to thirty-four. We joined the Tar River Baptist Association in our first year.

This will be the eighth time that we have had the honor of assisting with the Tar River Baptist Associational meetings. The previous years were 1874, 1893, 1916,

1939, 1953, 1964, and 1982.

The church organized a Sunday School in 1860 and, except for a period during the Civil War, has continued to hold Sunday School. The church started a WMU organization under the leadership of Professor Fonder. Today our WMU plays a very

large roll in our church and community.

The first church was a small frame building and was located north of the present building. It was built by Jordan Goodrich in 1884 and additions were made in 1893. It was remodeled in 1916, and Sunday School rooms were added in 1932. Membership had grown to 331. The land for the church was given by Wiley Bunting. On March 6, 1946 a Building Committee composed of R. L. King, A. W. Jenkins, F. R. Winstead and J. A. Freeman was appointed to make plans for building a new church. On May 5, 1946 the church accepted the old school building and a strip of land presented to them. This building was to be renovated and used as a parsonage. The first service was held in our present church on Sunday, December 12, 1948. The first baptism took place in the new building on April 23, 1950, with four candidates being baptized. The first female deacons served our church just prior to 1951. They were Mrs. R. C. Jones, Mrs. J. E. Taylor, Mrs. R. L. King, and Mrs. J. H. Hedgepeth.

Our present parsonage was completed and dedicated on October 18, 1950. This was also the year we celebrated our centennial. Mrs, Grace Freeman and Mrs. Ed Taylor were in charge of all the festivities. This celebration was attended by over 300 people, many of whom were former members. Rev. W. C. Francis and Rev. J. M. Johnson, both former pastors were in attendance as special guest. Pastor Hershel

Chevallier gave the centennial message.

For nearly a century we were a "part time" church, becoming a "full time" church in 1958. In 1959 the church voted to hold Wednesday night Bible Study in conjunction with choir practice. Our steeple was purchased and installed in 1975. Gifts of wall-to-wall carpet and new chandeliers were installed in 1979. Extensive remodeling was done to our fellowship building in 1987. In October of 1988 pew cushions were given in memory of Howell Jones. A PA system was purchased and installed in 1993.

We have been blessed of God to have twenty-seven different men serving as Pastor. We thank God for these men and what they have meant to our church. We are not able to count the ways and persons the Lord has used to bless our church over the past 136 years. Even today we are reaping the harvest of seed sown and prayers offered earlier by dedicated church members and faithful pastors. We cannot list all those who have made us what we are today - Philadelphia Baptist Church. We are grateful to all of them, and even more grateful to our God.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

This could be a banner year for Tar River Baptists. I am grateful to all who serve in places of associational leadership, and to each member church for the support given to mission causes through the Tar River Baptist Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. We are doing well in many areas, and I praise God for all that is being accomplished. I'm convinced, however, that we could do much more.

Many unmet mission needs exist right here within the association. Our only limitations are the ones we place upon ourselves. Tar River Baptists have the message, the manpower, the money, and the method to accomplish much, much more. Our message is the good news of the Gospel. The manpower, much of which is yet untapped, is within our forty-six churches and two Hispanic missions. Our people and our churches have the money, and the method is each church member giving at least a tithe to his church, and each church giving at least 5% of all undesignated contributions to the work of the Tar River Baptist Association. Only a few of our churches have reached the 5% giving level. If all of our churches did this, we would never have a financial worry. I encourage those who are not yet giving 5%, to begin with some increase, even if it is only 1% or less, and continue to increase annually until the 5% mark is reached. How wonderful it would be at the end of each month not to have to worry about whether there will be enough money to pay our bills and to meet the payroll.

One thing that I often hear from the laity is that little or nothing about the association is ever mentioned in their churches. We DELIVER copies of a monthly newsletter to each church. QUARTERLY BOARD MEETINGS are conducted, and ELEVEN key leaders of each church are automatically members of the Associational Board. REMINDERS are regularly mailed to the key leaders of each church prior to the quarterly Board Meetings. ANNOUNCEMENTS are made about associational ministry opportunities and training events almost every time any entity of the Tar River Baptist Family gathers. I don't know what more the office could do.

We rely heavily upon the pastors to attend associational functions and to keep their congregations informed. If a pastor cannot, or chooses not, to participate, he should inform his members about the life and work of the association, and encourage their participation. Why? The fact that the association is the only entity in our

denominational structure that churches JOIN is reason enough. A church doesn't join the Baptist State Convention or the Southern Baptist Convention. Many Baptists don't know that, but it's true. A church AFFILIATES with the Baptist State Convention, and also with the Southern Baptist Convention. Affiliation carries with it the idea of cooperation. A church does JOIN the association, and the association has some rules about who can and cannot be a part of that fellowship. This is reason enough for a church to want to stay abreast of what's happening in the association.

I move now to a different line of thought and call your attention to a new

paradigm in denominational life. The shift is from "programs" to "people." In our association a deliberate effort is being made to find out the needs of our churches and our people, and to provide for those needs. We will no longer push programs, but will concentrate on meeting the needs of people. We need to hear from our churches. Tell us what your needs are. We will make an honest effort to put the grease where the squeak is. If there is nothing available to meet your needs, we will endeavor to "tailor make" a package especially for you. Please let us hear from you.

Another item of importance is that construction is underway on our new

Associational Center. We need YOUR help NOW! We need CONTRIBUTIONS from churches and individuals. We will not borrow money for this project. We cannot, and we will not, use budget money to pay for debt service on this new building. If designated contributions for the BUILDING FUND do not come in, we will cease construction when the building fund money runs low. I would hate to see us have to do that, and there is no good reason why we should have to. A little sacrifice on everybody's part will enable us pay as we go, and complete the project without owing a penny on it. VOLUNTEERS are also needed. Framing is scheduled to begin about the first week in May. We will keep our churches informed about the work schedule and the skills needed. Some churches have sent a list of volunteers and their particular skills to the Associational Office; others need to do so. In advance, I want to thank all those who will have any part in making this long-awaited dream come true.

Thank you for allowing me to serve as your Director of Missions. It is a special joy and delight to work and grow with you.

Associational Executive Board Report

The Associational Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the Annual meeting in October 1994. 1994 December 19,

Moderator for the session was Dr. C. Ray Pruette. Seventeen people were present,

representing eleven churches.

WMU Council Director Mrs. Lottie Lou Dickens reported a prayer retreat for the Baptist Women's Day of Prayer which was held on November 6, with forty-two members present. An offering of \$93.00 was received at the retreat. Mrs. Millie Thompson, Baptist Women's Director, led the program with eight of the council members participating. The theme for the retreat was "Together in Christ We Worship and The WMU Council sponsored a baby shower for Mrs. Georgette Guin and gave her a stroller. The Tar River WMU joined the North Roanoke WMU in a special project in which they filled 200 boxes with toiletries and 200 bags with fruit. These were delivered to the Correctional Center for Women in Rocky Mount. Several churches sent donations to help restore Camp Mundo Vista, and others volunteered their time and labor. Sunday School Director David Averette announced the ASSISTeam Institute to be held in February, and the "Teaching with Style" Seminar to be held in March.

Rev. Gary McNair shared that Flat Rock Baptist Church had 206 in Sunday School

(for the first time in years).

Discipleship Training Supporter Jody Griffin reported that the association was continuing its efforts to determine needs. The goal is personal discipleship. Four pastors and the Director of Missions participated in "Fresh Encounter". The next strategy meeting will be January 16. He announced the Associational Bible Drill to be held in April.

Rev. Bill Wallace reported the WIN School to be held in January, and led by Rev. Marc Tilley.

Mrs. Georgette Guin presented the financial report for November.

Dr. Pruette and Rev. Wallace both expressed praise for the work done by Luis Maravi at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads.

Mr. Richard Morgan reported that the Franklinton area offered a great opportunity for Hispanic mission work.

Rev. Averette reported that in speaking with Luis, he discovered that the mission was averaging thirty-three on Sunday, and that they had a problem with transportation. Rev. Wallace reported that the Associational bus had been given to the mission.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren announced the Christmas caroling that was planned. Interested carolers will meet at Winn Dixie. After caroling at area nursing homes and the hospital, refreshments will be served at Louisburg Baptist Church.

Mr. Richard Morgan suggested that the December Council meeting be held before

December 15 in the future, due to the busyness of the season.

Rev. Wallace gave his Director of Missions' report. He expressed appreciation to Toy Store volunteers. The Toy Store Ministry resulted in 100 families (271 children) being helped, and four praying to receive Christ. He read thank-you cards that had been received from people that had been helped by the Toy Store ministry. He announced the Basketball league, and discussed the construction of the new Associational Building. He expressed appreciation to his wife, Joann, for her work in the office during the secretary's eleven weeks of maternity leave. March 27, 1995

Moderator for the session was Dr. C. Ray Pruette. Fifty-five people were present,

representing twenty-three churches.

WMU Council Director Lottie Lou Dickens reported that the Tar River WMU received the Distinguished award again for 1994. The WMU of Rocky Cross and Pilot will receive a plaque at the State WMU Annual meeting at Ridgecrest for being distinguished for ten years. The WMU participated in Project Help in which food and money was collected by the churches of the association for the needy. The WMU will also be making dresses to send to Honduras and the Ukraine. The Spring Annual WMU Meeting will be held on April 3, at Maple Springs Baptist Church, 6:30-8:30 p.m. Special music will be presented by Rachel Gilliam and the Ephesus BYW. Patricia Frazier will monologue the changes in WMU for the new year and Irma Duke, State Executive WMU Director, will bring the mission message. Mrs. Dickens urged pastors to attend the WMU Spring Meeting and encouraged their support of WMU. Plans are being made to start a WMU at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads and to provide refreshments for the mission each Sunday.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton encouraged volunteers to participate in three associational building projects: a storage building at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads, the new associational center, and the church at Sims. He also

announced upcoming RA events.

Sunday School Director David Averette reported that the Teaching with Style Seminar had been held on March 25, with 95 in attendance. He also announced the Sunday School Training School to be held in September. At the training school the ASSISTeam will teach "Going One on One" a comprehensive guide to outreach and visitation.

Discipleship Training Supporter Jody Griffin reported that a survey had been sent out to all of the churches requesting information that was needed to compile a discipling resource list to be given out at the semi-annual spring meeting. A strategy meeting was held on January 16, in which laypersons brainstormed ways to make discipling happen. At the May 15 strategy meeting they will try to identify discipling needs and ways to meet those needs. The Associational Bible Drill will be held April 10. The study of "Fresh Encounter" has been completed. Now in progress is a study of "Untangling Relationships."

Rev. Wallace, reporting for Evangelism Council Director Marc Tilley, said that the Associational Revival, March 23 and 24, was held at Beulah Church and about 35-40

attended each night.

Mrs. Elaine Lewis and Mrs. Georgette Guin gave the report for Music Council Director Nanette Warren. Preparations are being made for an Associational Children's Musical. Anyone interested should contact Nanette Warren at Pilot Baptist Church. The date for the Associational Music School has been changed to May 30. It will be held a Cedar Rock Baptist Church and led by Neil Eller from the Music Department of the Baptist State Convention.

Finance Committee Chairperson Annette Coppedge presented the financial report for February and explained the status of current finances. She also reviewed

transactions in the building fund.

Rev. Luis Maravi, Pastor for the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads reported that during December thru February the average attendance was thirty-five. I November thirty-three attended a Thanksgiving dinner. In December forty-seven attende a Christmas play which was followed by a fellowship complete with toys for the children. In January two were baptized. Four people attended the Winter Bible Study. Three people attended the Associational WIN School. March 12, the attendance was fifty-one and fifty-nine attended on the nineteenth. Fourteen have received Christ.

Rev. Wallace gave his Director of Missions' report. This report included the worschedule for the new associational center thru April, the need for funds to complete the new building, dates that he would be away to attend a DOM conference, information about the Associational Semi-Annual Meeting, and announcements about the VBS Clinics, the track meet, the construction of a storage building at the Hispanic Mission, and the summer mission trip to New York. He added to his report that two new conferences would be offered at the VBS Clinics: one for churches not using SBC materials, and one for those interested in doing Backyard Bible Clubs. He asked the churches to send to the office a list of volunteers who would be willing to help with the construction of the new building. He concluded his report by emphasizing that the association exists to serve the churches.

AFTERNOON SESSION

(Note from Clerk: Some reports are not printed in the Proceedings. They are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

- 1. The 165th Semi-Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Moderator C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church.
- 2. After a welcome and opening comments by Dr. Pruette, Director of Missions Bill Wallace led in singing the opening hymn, "Serve the Lord with Gladness."
- 3. Rev. Billy Tharrington, Beulah Christian Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
- 4. Dr. Pruette organized the session, and appointed Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock Baptist Church, as parliamentarian.
- 5. Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church, presented the report of the program committee with the following changes: the Nominating Report would be presented by Rev. Wallace, special music not listed in the printed program would be presented during the memorial service, and the Sunday School report would be presented by Rev. Shelby Stephens of the Pilot Baptist Church. Mr. Cam Stallings, Pilot Baptist Church, made a motion to adopt the program with changes as presented by Rev. McNair. The motion was duly seconded, and the vote carried.
- 6. Rev. Wallace recognized the following new pastors: Rev. Charles Collie, Cypress Chapel; Rev. Earnie Taylor, Oak Grove; and Rev. Eldon Reich, Bethlehem. He also recognized Rev. Terry Smoak, the youth minister at Pine Ridge; and Mr. Richard Petite, representative for the Baptist Children's Homes of NC.
- 7. Mrs. Georgette Guin, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, recognized the twenty honor clerks.
- 8. The histories of the host churches were presented by Mrs. Connie Tharrington, Beulah Christian Baptist Church; Mrs. Susan Temple, Bethlehem Baptist Church; and Mrs. Annette Aldridde, Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church;
- Annette Aldridge, Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church.

 9. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, "When we Walk with the Lord."

 10. Rev. William Yates expressed appreciation from the NC Baptist Hospital. He explained that the insignia for Baptist Hospital, a cross with open hands, symbolized that all healing comes from God; prayer is a significant part of healing; and that God's healing often comes from human hands. He also explained that contributions given
- to the special offering taken at Mother's Day for Baptist Hospital were used to help people who could not afford health care.

 11. Miss Irma Gupton, Mount Zion Baptist Church, presented the historian's report.

 12. Rev. C. W. Driver, Union Chapel Baptist Church, in his presentation of the Time, Place, and Preacher Report, recommended that the next Spring Session be held at the Red Bud Baptist Church, and that the appual correct by heavesth but They Work and the Red
- Bud Baptist Church, and that the annual sermon be brought by Rev. Norris Cook of the Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church, with Rev. Gordon Joyner of the Holly Grove Baptist Church as the alternate preacher. He indicated that volunteers are needed to assist Red Bud at the spring meeting, and to host and assist the fall session.
- 13. Rev. Wallace presented the nominating committee report. Rev. Cecil Aldridge, Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church, made a motion to accept the report as printed and to permit the vacancies to be filled by the committee without bringing it back to the body for approval. The motion was duly seconded, and the vote carried.
- 14. A brief installation service was held for the officers and leaders of the association for the 1995-96 year.
- 15. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, "Send Me, O Lord, Send Me."
- 16. Mr. Pete Colbert, Franklinton Baptist Church, gave the treasurer's report. He presented the September financial report. He indicated that finances were low, and that it was difficult to meet monthly obligations when the churches don't respond. He expressed appreciation to the churches and individuals that were supporting the association.

- 17. Mrs. Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the proposed budget for 1996, and made a motion that it be adopted. The motion was duly seconded, and the vote carried.
- 18. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, "Rescue the Perishing."
- 19. An offering was taken for the new Associational Missions and Resource Center. The memorial service began with special music presented by Mr. Kenny Sutton and 20. Miss Nanette Warren, both of Pilot Baptist Church. Rev. Norris Cook, Hopkins Chapel

Baptist Church, shared scripture. Mrs. Joann Mitchell, Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church, closed the memorial service with special music.

Rev. Wallace presented the Director of Missions' report. In addition to the printed report, he encouraged participation with the Listening Team from the Baptist State Convention and with the Toy Store Ministry. He said that over eight years ago the association had made a commitment to build a new associational center on property that had been donated. Construction began in May 1995. Over forty contributors have given donations, and over fifty-two volunteers have donated free labor. The building is now dried in and the electrical and plumbing work has been roughed in. The brick work will begin next week. We still need volunteers and contributions.

Several volunteers who had donated labor at the new center shared briefly. They 22. were Mr. Cam Stallings, Pilot Baptist Church; Mr. Milton Hobbs, Lake Royale; Mr. Willard Leonard, Centerville Baptist Church; Mr. Glen Strickland, Poplar Springs Baptist Church; and Rev. Paul Douglas, Cedar Rock Baptist Church. 23. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Rev. Cecil Aldridge, Ransdell

Chapel Baptist Church.

EVENING SESSION

Moderator C. Ray Pruette called the meeting to order.

2. A men's choir from Pilot Baptist Church presented special music.

3. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, "Follow On."

Rev. Eldon Reich, Bethlehem Baptist Church, read scripture, and led in prayer.
 Rev. Shelby Stephens, Pilot Baptist Church, presented the Sunday School Council

report. 6. Mrs. Wendy Edwards, Spring Hope, First Baptist Church, introduced a new member of the Discipleship Support Team, Rev. Rickey Letson, Castalia Baptist Church. Rev. Letson made reference to the great commission, and emphasized that we should go and make disciples. He indicated that the Support Team is available to help the churches. Rev. Jody Griffin, Spring Hope, First Baptist Church, led a discipleship presentation, with several quest speakers. Rev. Stephen Brock-Loftis, Maple Springs Baptist Church, distributed Discipleship newsletters.

7. Mrs. Lottie Lou Dickens, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the WMU report. She explained that the WMU Council is now called the WMU Leadership Team. She expressed appreciation to the pastors and the Director of Missions for their support. A WMU organization has been started at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads. At the WMU Fall Workshop in September the churches with the most new members were recognized as follows: Flat Rock, First Place; Philadelphia, Second Place; and

Franklinton and Sandy Creek, tying for Third Place.

8. Mr. Wayne Gupton, Red Bud Baptist Church, presented the report for the Brotherhood Council. He announced that a new unit had been started, and that some inactive units were now active again. He emphasized that RAs are the Baptist Men of the future. He asked, "What kind of example are we setting for our children?" He reported that a dedicated person, interested in RA work was needed to fill the vacant position of RA Director in the Association.

9. Rev. Marc Tilley, Union Hope Baptist Church, presented the Evangelism Council

report.

10. Rev. Wallace presented the Media-Library Council report as printed because Ms. Margaret Holmes, Poplar Spring Baptist Church, had had to leave due to a death in her church.

- 11. Miss Nanette Warren, Pilot Baptist Church, presented the Music Council report. She made the following announcements: Christmas caroling is scheduled for December 21, and in 1996 a choir consisting of Pastors and Music Directors is being planned. She emphasized that if you are willing to use your talents for the Lord, He will open doors.
- 12. Special music was presented by the Associational Choir.

Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, "We've a Story to Tell." 13.

Rev. Wallace began the presentation on volunteers and partnership missions. He 14. emphasized that all the association does is carried out through volunteer efforts.

- 15. Don and Greta Paith, volunteers who served in the Ukraine, gave a brief testimony. They reported that while in the Ukraine 150 volunteers built fifteen churches and conducted Vacation Bible Schools. They encouraged people to volunteer, either by going or by "holding the ropes" so others could go.
- 16. Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church, made a motion that Tar River Baptist Association participate in a partnership with South Africa. This recommendation had been approved by the Associational Council and the General Board. The motion was duly seconded, and the vote carried.
- 17. Rev. Carl Poole, Rock Spring Baptist Church, reported that his church sponsored a mission team of eight youth and six adults to Hurley, New York. They did renovations and conducted Backyard Bible Clubs. He encouraged volunteers to go to New York because there is very little Southern Baptist influence in that state.
- 18. Ms. Janet Wall, Beulah Christian Baptist Church, reported that a team from the association went to Schnectady, New York. She said that they had the opportunity to take God's word to the streets using puppets and music. She suggested that people "just serve the Lord."
- 19. Mr. Adolphus Batchelor, Holly Grove Baptist Church, said that you don't know what missions is all about until you go on a mission trip. He indicated that it was a joy to give your time to the Lord. He said that while in New York he had the opportunity to share his testimony.
- 20. Miss Namette Warren, a member of the Associational Mission Team to New York, encouraged volunteering. She said that even if you didn't have any talents you could do puppets.
- 21. Rev. Wallace promised that when you volunteered, the Lord blessed. He asked that if the Lord doesn't call you to volunteer, please help someone else to go.
- 22. Special music was presented by Rev. David Anderson, Pleasant Grove Baptist Church. 23. Ms. Kathy Hall, church member and missionary in Schnectady, New York, shared her testimony and challenged possible to the control of the con
- testimony and challenged people to volunteer.

 24. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reporting for the Credentials Committee, said that attendance at the Fall Annual Meeting for 1995 was as follows: 33 churches,
- 105 messengers, 12 alternates, 26 pastors, 16 associational officers, 40 guests from the association, and 7 guests outside the association (for a total of 206 people.) 25. The Resolutions Committee Report was given by Rev. Jody Griffin, Spring Hope, First Baptist Church, as follows:

RESOLUTION 1: APPRECIATION TO THE HOST AND ASSISTING CHURCHES

Whereas the Beulah Christian Baptist Church and the assisting Bethlehem and Ransdell Chapel Baptist Churches have graciously welcomed and cared for the messengers and visitors to the 1995 Annual Meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association by opening their doors and their hearts, and

Whereas they have provided us with excellent hospitality and a delicious meal, Be it therefore resolved that we express to these churches our heartfelt appreciation for lovingly and abundantly providing for the needs and comforts of all who attended this 165th Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association. RESOLUTION 2: COMMENDATION TO THE MODERATOR

Whereas Dr. C. Ray Pruette has faithfully served as Moderator of our Association for the past two years, presiding with dignity and fairness, and conducting the quarterly meetings of the Associational Board with expertise and proficiency,

Be it therefore resolved that we express to Dr. Pruette our love with genuine appreciation for the leadership and service he has provided with vim, vigor, and vitality throughout his term of office. May he keep on, keeping on.

Rev. Griffin made a motion that these resolutions be adopted. The vote carried. 26. Moderator C. Ray Pruette expressed appreciation to the host churches; to the association for its support and love during his tenure as moderator; to Rev. Wallace for guidance, encouragement, and support; and to the pastors and the churches for their love, support, and encouragement. He emphasized that together we can make a difference, and that we have a past to honor.

27. Dr. C. Ray Pruette passed the gavel to the new moderator, Rev. Gary McNair. Rev. McNair accepted the gavel of responsibility. He expressed appreciation to Dr. Pruette, and adjourned the meeting with prayer.

HISTORY OF BEULAH CHRISTIAN BAPTIST CHURCH

Beulah Christian Church was founded when a group of dissenters under the leadership of Mrs. Virginia Terrell withdrew from Rolesville Baptist Church. Since no building was available the group began to meet under a bush arbor on Pulley Town Road southeast of Rolesville Crossroads.

In 1887, Calvin Mitchell gave land on which to build near Mitchell's Pond. Mitchell also sawed the timber which had been donated for the building. The first church building was one room, lit by kerosene lamps, and heated by a wood stove over to one side.

Services in the new church were often interrupted by Sunday morning swimmers in the pond above the old mill site. In September of 1931, a business meeting was held to discuss repair of the church, but because of the Sunday swimmers, a decision was made to relocate the church to land that had been donated by Burwell Perry. By May of 1932, the first service was held at the new (and present) location.

In 1940, repairs were made and wings were added to the church. A new pulpit was installed. Four years later two classrooms were added; the top was restored; and the In 1950 the church floors were sanded, the inside painted, and new outside painted.

pews were installed along with a piano and heating.

As the congregation grew in membership improvements, repairs, and additions were made. By 1959, more classrooms were added. In 1962, the church added stained glass windows, placed in honor of or in memory of loved ones. At this time, the church decided to brick the building.

Services at Beulah was held in connection with New Hope Christian Church, and the pastor commuted to accommodate both services each Sunday. In 1963, the church decided

to emerge independently; so Beulah began on its own.

In 1967, the church purchased two acres of land from Ms. Lucy Perry Ueargin, and built a parsonage just north of Highway 96. The parsonage is a three bedroom, totally electric home with a fireplace. It includes a pastor's study, a living room, a dining room, a family room, and two bathrooms. A garage adjoins the house.

The church had no water or bathroom facilities; so in 1968, the Adult Men's Class had the well dug, the Young Men's Class bought a pump, and the Intermediate Boys' Class purchased and installed the water fountain. Bathroom facilities were completed between

1969 and 1970.

In 1975, a fellowship building was built; and in 1978, the Women's Fellowship

raised money to brick the fellowship building.

In 1979, the church added the baptistery. The pews were covered by members in honor of or in memory of loved ones. The steeple was added by the Missionary Women. A picnic shelter was built in 1982 in honor of Ms. Mamie Pulley, the oldest member

still attending our congregation.

By 1985, the church was found to be so infested with termites that it was beyond repairs. At this time, plans were made to build a new church on the same site. By March 9, 1986, the new church had been completed and the first services held.

On September 18, 1988, Rev. Billy Tharrington was called to be Pastor.
In October 1989, Beulah Church petitioned the Tar River Baptist Association for membership and was received under the watchcare of the association. In October 1990,

Beulah was accepted as a member church of the association.

Since June 23, 1991, Beulah has ordained three men into the gospel ministry. At the present two men are training for the ministry at Southeastern Seminary.

Today, Beulah is more beautiful than ever with its original stained glass windows still on each side as they were in the old church. The picture of Jesus kneeling, originally use to overlook the baptistery, is now out front overlooking all who come in. The lighted steeple, like a beacon, can be seen for miles around by anyone seeking restitution through God's forgiveness.

HISTORY OF BETHLEHEM BAPTIST CHURCH 1895-1995

One hundred years ago Bethlehem Baptist Church in Franklin County was established. Rev. M. R. Pernell and Rev. E. J. Harrell led deacons J. A. Clifton, C. G. Mitchell, and W. W. Perry in constituting a Missionary Baptist Church in the Riley Crossroads Community known as the "County Line". Approximately fifteen members adopted a covenant and article of faith.

Rev. Pernell was called as the first pastor, at a salary of \$10.00 for 1895 and \$25.00 for 1896. A small building on land adjoining the Riley Academy, or with the

academy itself, was used as a meeting house. This land was located across the road from the present church in the area that is now the cemetery.

During the tenure of Rev. C. C. Williams work on a church building was begun in 1897. J. R. Harris was paid \$36.00 to construct a building $32' \times 40'$ on land donated by W. W. Perry. The first services were held in the new house of worship on November 5, 1898. Pastor G. W. Coppedge brought the message, using as his text Philippians 4:6 "Let your requests be made known unto God."

Church conference minutes from a meeting in June of 1896 recorded five men being named as delegates to the association or "union meeting". According to the early records, delegates were appointed to these meetings several times each year. In 1897 it was reported that "a collection was taken up at the association meeting for Bethlehem Church which amounted to \$5.11." Also in 1987 the first mention of church trustees was noted. E. G. Conyers, H. M. Norwood, and L. Y. Baker were selected to serve in this capacity.

In 1903 mention was made of three delegates being appointed to a Sunday School convention. For the next several years members were regularly appointed to attend conventions meeting at churches including Wakefield, Forestville, and Wake Crossroads.

In 1910 land was purchased for the church cemetery. In the fall of 1911 a committee was appointed to contact each church member "to see how much they would pay for missions."

Bethlehem had thirteen pastors from 1900-1920. Most served for only one or two years. They included the following: M. R. Pernell, J. D. Morris, W. H. Whitehead, C. G. Lowe, T. C. Singleton, C. C. Williams, Z. W. Whelless, G. P. Harrell, John Mitchner, C. C. Williams, G. T. Williams, C. T. Plybon, J. H. Bunn, and Mack Stamps. Rev. Williams was called to Bethlehem three times during a twenty-year period.

During the 1920's conferences were not held as regularly as in years prior; therefore, little information about church activities exists for that period. Pastors during that decade were W. R. Wallace, H. T. Wright, Frank Edwards, B. G. Earley, S. L. Lamm, Paul Caudle, L. M. Hammonds, and Charles Howard. In 1929 Sunday School rooms were added to the church with lumber donated by C. E. Richards.

Bethlehem Church and the surrounding community did not escape the hard times of Depression years during the early thirties. However, the commitment of a few faithful members kept the doors of the church open throughout that challenging period. Again, infrequent conferences resulted in sparse records. Reverends L. R. Evans, A. D. Parrish, and D. M. Branch served as pastor of the small congregation through 1938. Rev. William Cone was called to serve from 1939-1942. Rev. A. F. Gibson, a member of Bethlehem, was ordained into the ministry in April of 1942. In 1944 while J. L. Atkins was pastor, a vote "was made to combine the Raleigh and Central Associations." During that year a plan was adopted to send "all boys in service a message each month." A collection of \$4.06 was taken for this purpose.

During the 1950's the church at the "County Line' began to recover from the difficult years of the previous two decades. Repairs were made and new pews were purchased for Sunday School rooms. An electric organ was bought in 1952. The cemetery was expanded; Vacation Bible School was held; and the Baptist Training Union was reorganized. Pastors during this period were Fred Crisp, Eldridge Vinson, Ellis Hollon, and Wendell Page.

Growth during the 1960's lead to a new building program. Six Sunday School rooms were added as well as a basement. The sanctuary was remodeled and a choir loft added. To enhance worship, a new organ was purchased in 1962, and a piano was given by Mr. and Mrs. Eric Pearce in 1963. Roy Walker, David Pope, and Jerry Mullinax were pastors through 1967. Rev. Pope was the first pastor to reside in the community, when he moved his mobile home onto the church property. In 1964, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Phillips gave land for a parsonage. When the work on a parsonage began in 1965, church and community members contributed much of the labor and materials needed for the completion of this project. A dedication service was held on July 16, 1967, conducted by Rev. Mullinax.

During the pastorate of Rev. Thomas Lomas from 1967-1972, Bethlehem changed from the Raleigh Association to the Tar River Baptist Association in 1968. In 1972 the parsonage debt was paid off so attention was given to needed improvements for the church. Air conditioning was added, storm windows, doors, and awnings were installed, and repairs made to the roof. A kitchen was furnished in the basement fellowship hall,

carpet was added and Mr. Cordell Richards donated a piano.

The mid 1970's were characterized by beautification projects for the sanctuary. Pews were covered and carpet was installed. Vestibule furniture was given by Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Gay. Pastors Joe Kassam and Robert Haddock served Bethlehem through 1976. Dr. Carroll Trotter and Dr. Elmo Scoggins served interim positions during 1977. Rev. Kenneth Batts was pastor in 1980.

Rev. Alfred Snipes came to Bethlehem as interim pastor in 1980. He then served as pastor until 1985. Rev. Daniel Benfield's pastorate was following until 1987. Rev. Snipes returned to fill the pulpit as interim during 1988 until Rev. John Sisson was called. He led the congregation for almost two years. The decade of the eighties brought continued improvement projects, such as new carpet and paint for Sunday School rooms, paint for the church exterior, rear steps from the upstairs level, and a cement patio area at the basement level.

Dr. William Pyle, interim during most of 1990, was followed by Rev. Dannie Hayes. WMU, Brotherhood, GAs, RAs, Acteens, and Bible Friends groups were organized. Plans for a new church building have been a major focus during the 1990's. In 1993 land for the new church was purchased. While Rev. W. C. Barham was interim pastor, plans were completed for the new sanctuary, and preparations for the Centennial Celebration were began. Rev. Eldon Reich, current pastor, was called in August 1995, and was ordained at Bethlehem on September 10, 1995. Activities to commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the founding of Bethlehem Church are planned for the entire month of October. The congregation hopes that a ground breaking ceremony near the end of the month will culminate the festivities.

HISTORY OF RANSDELL CHAPEL BAPTIST CHURCH 1912-1995

Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church is located in the Royal Community on state road

1706 in the Harris Township, approximately eight miles south of Louisburg.

The church was founded upon the conviction of Mr. William Caswell Ransdell that he had received a spiritual vision from God to preach and to build a church. In 1912, Mr. Ransdell organized a meeting for Sunday School and Worship which met under a brush arbor that he had constructed. Mr. Ransdell invited Rev. Walter M. Gilmore, of Louisburg, NC, to assist him with the first meeting. Approximately one hundred people attended. A survey revealed that most of the people who had attended the services were not affiliated with any church; therefore, Mr. Ransdell and Rev. Gilmore continued the services for the remainder of the summer.

During the Spring of 1913, under the leadership of Mr. Ransdell, a frame building was erected. Mr. Ransdell who owned a sawmill, donated and cut the timber to erect the

building.

At an early church conference, Mr. Isaac Frazier suggested that the church be named Ransdell Chapel in honor of Mr. William C. Ransdell. Some of the charter members present were Mr. John R. Clifton, Mr. Preston T. Clifton, Mr, and Mrs. Isaac Frazier, Mrs. Martha H. Horton, Mr. W. T. Jones, Mr. Bailey F. Pearce, and Mrs. Mollie C. Young. In 1920, Ransdell Chapel was accepted in the Tar River Baptist Association. The

membership was seventeen. The first Deacons, elected in 1920, were Mr. John R. Clifton, Mr. Freston T. Clifton, and Mr. Thomas T. Young. The first Board of Trustees elected were Mr. W. T. Jones, Mr. J. B. Horton, and Mr. William C. Ransdell.

During the next two decades, Ransdell Chapel continued to grow and to witness to

the community.

In 1943, the building erected under the leadership of Mr. Ransdell was torn down, and a new frame building was erected where the old one stood. The present Sanctuary and two wing rooms are the building that was erected in 1943. The Building Committee consisted of Mr. James L. Denton, Mr. John W. Horton, Mr. Thomas T. Young, Mr. Dock Cash, Mr. Charlie Dickens, and Rev. Edward W. Greene. In 1947, Mr. and Mrs. William T. Horton donated an acre of land to be used for a

cemetery.

In 1960, fulltime worship was implemented. The building was completely renovated on the inside.

In 1963, new pews and hardwood floors were installed in the sanctuary. Mr. and Mrs. James S. Hunt gave the pulpit in memory of their daughter Gwendolyn.

In 1968, Mrs. Alma L. Cates donated carpet for the sanctuary in memory of her late husband, Mr. Franklin Thomas Cates. During the next decade and half, the church continued to grow in membership and

additions to the building were made.

In 1973, four classrooms, bathrooms, and a fellowship hall were added. Mrs. Adele C. Cash donated the cost of a well and pump in memory of her late husband Mr. Dock Cash. The church purchased an additional acre of land to enlarge the cemetery.

In 1975, the exterior of the building was bricked and remodeled. Central heat and air condition was installed. New lights were installed in the sanctuary.

In 1978, a note burning ceremony was held to retire the debt.

In 1979, Mrs. Etta Ransdell Ledwick, a daughter of Mr. William C. Ransdell, the last charter member of Ransdell Chapel, went to be with her Lord. She willed her estate to Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church. Her will noted that it was her desire that a parsonage be erected. On July 27, 1980 a Dedication Service was held and the parsonage was dedicated to the glory of God. Dr. W. R. McCollum delivered the dedication message. Rev. Jerry Sosebee and his family were the first to occupy the parsonage.

In 1981, a steeple was installed on the church. It added much beauty to the building, but more importantly it made the building more visible from a greater

distance.

beginning.

On June 12, 1983 the church licensed Rev. James Horton to the gospel ministry. renovation and enlargement of the church took place - a foyer, four classrooms, a baptistery, a choir loft, and air conditioning was added, the inside was completely renovated, and insulation was installed in the buildings. Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Rice donated an organ to the church. The church called its first music director, Rev. Rob Small. His wife, Cheryl Small, was the first organist. Mrs. Margie Martin was the first candidate to be baptized in the new baptistery.

In 1989, a picnic shelter was erected. A new heating and air conditioning system

was installed in the parsonage.

During the eighty three year history of Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church, thirty men have served as pastor. They are as follows: Rev. Walter M. Gilmore

DISCIPLESHIP TRAINING REPORT





HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The following is a list of the outstanding achievements in the churches of the Tar River Baptist Association during 1994-95:

BETHLEHEM - Our new Pastor, Rev. Eldon Reich, started July 23, 1995. An ordination service was held for Rev. Reich September 10,1995. Three people were baptized. We celebrated our 100th birthday with activities throughout October 1995. A groundbreaking service for the new church building will be held on October 29, 1995. BEULAH - A new position of Youth Minister was added as a part-time staff position.

BUNN - We started a Children's Church.

CASTALIA - Rev. Rickey Letson was called as pastor. Three new members added by letter and twelve by baptism. A very successful VBS led to several decisions to accept Christ. A youth group and a Bible Study group for youth was organized.

CEDAR ROCK - A Children's Church was started on the first, third and fifth Sundays of every month. Missions Friends meet on the second and fourth Sundays. A monthly newsletter was started by the pastor and his wife. Homecoming speaker was Rev. Andy Cook, a former pastor. Jason Taylor was elected as Music Director. A Children's Choir was started. The church participated in "Here's Hope", a witnessing program. We installed a new PA system. VBS was successful. The Pastor attended the SBC in Georgia. We renovated the educational building and the basement. Youth Bible Study was started on Wednesday nights. Ten youth attended Camp Caswell.

CENTERVILLE - We had our church history microfilmed. An ordination service was held for David Brooks. New chandeliers were hung in the sanctuary. The bathrooms were remodeled. Improvements were made to the library.

COMMUNITY - The inside and the outside of the church was completely renovated. A bathroom and kitchen area was added. A lot of landscaping work was done. A new sign for the church was donated.

CORINTE - Improvements were made to the church cemetery. The older basement and church office was carpeted. The following was purchased: a machine and tapes for recording sermons for shut-ins; chairs, curtains, and blinds for some classrooms; mower for the parsonage; outdoor playground equipment; and new choir robes. The hallway was painted. FLAT ROCK - A group of ten person, including the pastor, went on a ten day mission trip to Belize, Central America. Renovations were completed on the Sunday School classrooms. Ten young people and four adults attended World Missions Week at Caswell. We welcome six new members by bantism and seven by letter

FRANKLINTON - We participated in the associational toy ministry. Fifteen members went

to the Holy Land. Rev. Scott Taylor was called as Minister of Music. New books were placed in the library. The number of deacons were increased from fifteen to eighteen. All Missions offering goals were exceeded. We welcome forty new members: twenty-two by baptism and eighteen by letter. We hosted the Associational Fall WMU workshop. HARRIS CHAPEL - We have five choirs including a new Children's Handbell Choir and an Adult Handbell Choir. Twelve were baptized. The GAs attended Camp Caraway. We visit

Hillside Nursing Home at Wake Forest each Sunday afternoon. The Wednesday night youth

program has grown.

HICKORY ROCK - Our church was incorporated.

LOUISBURG - We supported the Ukraine Mission Project. Our second annual churchwide picnic was held. Revival services were led by Dr. Fred Grissom and Dr. Carroll Trotter. A new van was purchased. From Christmas to Easter a focus on the Gospel of John, a Bible study group, and a series of sermons by the pastor was held. Renee Lloyd was ordained into the Gospel Ministry. The adult choir led in the Christmas and Easter Cantatas, and along with the Children's Choir led the "Hanging of the Greens." Monthly worship services are held at the Louisburg Manor.

MAPLE SPRINGS - We are working on the building fund and looking forward to a new and larger fellowship hall.

MOUNT ZION - We observed the Weeks of Prayer and offering for home and foreign missions. We participated in the toy store ministry of the TRBA. We had a successful VBS. A Fall Festival was sponsored by the Adult I Sunday School Class. The Dark Scholarship Fund was presented to two members of our church. The Pastor attended the SBC in Atlanta. We welcome six new members: two by baptism and four by letter. A brass table cross was given as a memorial. A piano light, wooden entrance doors to the sanctuary, and steal entrance doors were installed.

MOUNTAIN GROVE - Rev. Rhinehold Koschel was called as pastor. We welcome eight new members: four by baptism and four by letter. The pastor and four members attended the SBC in Atlanta.

OAK GROVE - An ordination service was held for Daniel Southern in June.

PEACHTREE - Mr. Aubrey Farmer was ordained as a deacon.

PEARCE - Six new members were added to our church: four by letter and two by baptism. We completed a new prayer room in memory of Gordon Hood. A new heat and air unit was installed in the parsonage. We installed a new sound system and chimes. We purchased equipment for the playground and picnic area. We participated in the associational toy ministry. The church parking lot was paved.

PERRY'S CHAPEL - Miss Elizabeth Pearce began her service as a Journeyman in San Jose, Costa Rica on August 8, 1995.

PILOT - The Brotherhood helped to build a storage building at the Strickland's Crossroads Hispanic Mission. They also helped with the new Associational Office building. Some of our members went with the Association on a mission trip to New York. Some of the youth went on a mission trip to Norfolk, VA.

PLEASANT GROVE - We hired a youth minister. A TV and VCR for church use and youth programs was purchased. We welcome seven new members by baptism.

POPLAR SPRING - We have added a youth pianist to our church family. The youth have started a visitation program to the rest homes. We started a church visitation program.

RED BUD - A GA Recognition Service was held in January. The Youth Sunday School Class and their leaders attended World Missions Week at Caswell. We had good representation at Carowinds for Baptist Day. We used our new educational building for the first time on Homecoming Day the second Sunday on October. Rev. Leo Lowery and his wife attended the SBC in Atlanta. Brad Tharrington and Travis Wood served as Pages at the SBC in Atlanta. Acteens and GAs attended Camp Mundo Vista. We received eight members by baptism, five by letter, one by statement. Two members were re-baptized.

ROCK SPRING - We purchased additional land adjoining the church land.

ROCKY CROSS - We painted the inside of the parsonage and the church. We put signs at the crossroads pointing to the church. We landscaped the church yard.

SAMARIA - The youth meet once each week. Worship services are held at 5 p.m. on Sunday nights. A Ground breaking Ceremony was held on January 8, 1995 for our "Christian Life Center." A dedication service was held for this building on June 4. The Mission Friends, GAs, Acteens, RAs, and the College and Career members are involved in many activities promoting the building fund. We started publishing a newsletter for the church each quarter.

SANDY CREEK - In December 1994, Jeff Noble was called as Minister of Music and Youth. Three of our children participated in the associational Bible Drills. In June 1995, our pastor Rev. Kevin King resigned with plans to move to Georgia. Following his resignation, Jeff Noble left also with plans to go to a church in South Carolina. In July 1995, Jon Dorsey was called as Interim Pastor, and Joe Bufford was called as Interim Minister of Youth. At the Fall Associational meeting in 1994 Sandra Gupton, our Church Clerk was recognized as an "Honor Clerk". We observed the Weeks of Prayer for Home and Foreign Missions. We collected special missions offerings. Many improvements were made to the church and grounds. We participated in the Associational Toy Ministry. We have an on-going food pantry.

UNION CHAPEL - On October 30, 1994, the dedication of our fellowship hall in honor of Mrs. Marjorie Mitchell was held.

UNION HOPE - The church parking lot was paved. A woman was elected as Sunday School Director for the first time in the history of the church.

WHITE LEVEL - A very successful VBS was held. On every fifth Wednesday, night a special fellowship is held with a meal and special program. A tape ministry was started. Some members attended leadership training. Approximately forty attended Caswell.

WOOD - The church membership and Sunday School rolls were completely revamped. \$59,000.00 worth of renovations to the church were completed. Two hundred attended worship on Easter and 306 attended worship on Homecoming. The Pastor published the history of the community Hills and Hearts of Gold. The largest number of baptisms and the largest total additions since 1923 were experienced. The largest single offering in the history of the church was collected on August 20.

HISPANIC WORK AT SANDY CREEK

The Ministry among the Hispanic Migrants was generally slow for the first part of the summer. We visited the farms Sunday after Sunday, but could not find the people. As we began to investigate as to their where-abouts, we discovered that instead of being at work, which we knew, they all had gone shopping at Wal-Mart and Food Lion. So we changed our place of encounter with them. Instead of meeting with a few at the church, we found fifty to 100 of them enjoying the air condition of the shopping center. We have been able to witness to them one on one. Not only have we found the ones from the farms of Franklin County, but we also have witnessed to and given tracts in Spanish to migrant shoppers from Zebulon, Castalia, Oxford, Youngsville, Wood, Epsom, and Bunn. By their not being on the farms and us carrying a few of them to church for services, we have broadened our outreach. We are doing like Jesus and the apostles did. We are reaching the people in the market place. It has been more enjoyable witnessing to them on a one to one basis than preaching to the few that would occasionally come to church. I do believe it will be more lasting. We not only explain the plan of salvation to them as we witness, but we also give it to them in writing in tract form to carry with them. Week after week we see many of the same

ones, and they appear with an altogether different attitude as we speak to them for the second and third time. I believe there will be great fruit from this new phase of ministry. We ask you to pray for a great harvest of souls.

HISPANIC WORK AT STRICKLAND'S CROSSROADS

God has blessed His work at Strickland's Crossroads Hispanic Mission. During the first four months of our ministry (June-Sept. 1994), our average attendance was thirtyfive for Sunday School and worship services. Four people were baptized. Some of our tasks during this period were giving out tracts, visiting camps to show Christian movies, picking up people to bring to church, helping people in the courthouse, hospitals, driver license tests, with language problems.

In October most of the migrant workers go somewhere else to get other jobs, so we had more time to visit people living year round in the area. Many of them accepted the invitation to come and worship God with us. It permitted us to have an average attendance of thirty during the cold weather.

Some of our highlights during these months of work were: dinner for Thanksgiving in November, a brief play for Christmas followed by a fellowship meal, and the Winter Bible study on Galatians in January. Two more people were baptized in January.

Our attendance started to grow in March with thirty-eight people, thirty-nine in April, thirty-five in May, and thirty-eight in June. June 29-July 2, we celebrated our fourth anniversary with a revival. Our guests speakers were Rev. Pablo Flores from Oxford, NC and Rev. Richard Contreras from Houston, Texas. During this revival twentynine adults and thirteen children received Christ as their personal Savior. Our top attendance was 130 people on Saturday night, July 1.

During this time another Hispanic Congregation, the Hispanic Baptist Mission from Parkwood Baptist Church in Rocky Mount, decided to merge with us. This new situation has been a real blessing for us because we now have a stronger membership willing to work for the Lord.

We had VBS on two Saturdays in August with an attendance of fifty-six children and eight workers.

The work has not been easy because the enemy is always ready to destroy God's work, but He is bigger than anything else. We ask your prayers for us, the leaders, and the believers. The Bible says: "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." We probably haven't yet seen the wonderful things that God can do at Strickland's Crossroads. In the name of all our membership, we thank God, the Tar River Baptist Association, and all the churches for supporting us with prayers, and personal efforts. We ask all of you to continue doing so.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Associational Board has met twice for its quarterly meetings since the semi-annual meeting in April. Both meetings were held at Duke Memorial Baptist Church. 1995

Moderator for the session was Dr. C. Ray Pruette. Thirty-seven people were present, representing nineteen churches. Epp Catlett was appointed as parliamentarian.

WMU Council Director Mrs. Lottie Lou Dickens reported that the WMU Council members would be attending training at Caraway in July. A bus trip was planned to Georgia for the Southern Baptist Convention.

Brotherhood Council Director Mr. Wayne Gupton announced training for Baptist Men and RA Leaders to be held in September, at Red Bud Baptist Church. He encouraged people to volunteer to help build the Associational Center.

Discipleship Training Supporter Rev. Jody Griffin reported that a letter had been sent to Church Library Directors with suggestions of Discipleship materials for church libraries, that a strategy meeting was held on May 15, that a study of "Untangling Relationships' will be completed in July, that the Discipleship Support Team will be attending training at Caraway in August, and that "Calling All Christians To Growth" will be held in October.

Music Council Director Miss Nanette Warren reported that five churches participated in the Music School, and three churches are involved in the Children's Musical.

Mrs. Georgette Guin presented the May financial report and gave an update on the status of the building fund.

Rev. Luis Maravi, Pastor at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads, reported that attendance at the mission is about twenty-to thirty. Three people have recently prayed to receive Christ. Revival will be held at the mission in July. A four year anniversary celebration will be held on July 2. A congregation in Rocky Mount has expressed interest in joining the mission at Strickland's Crossroads.

Director of Missions Rev. Bill Wallace reported that the Missions Development Council was looking into the request of the Rocky Mount Hispanic congregation. He gave an update on the construction of the new Associational Center, indicating that volunteers and contributions were needed to complete construction. A team will be going on a mission trip to New York. The Key leadership Conference will be held in August. Rev. Wallace made an appeal to the churches to increase their giving to the association so as not to curtail the mission work or shorten the outreach arm of the association. The Associational Sunday School Training School will be held in September. Brad Tharrington and Travis Wood, both from Red Bud Baptist Church, served as pages at the Southern Baptist Convention.

Rev. David Anderson, Pastor of the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church, recommended that pastors ask each person in their church to give one dollar on July 2, to help defray the costs of the associational expenses.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Rev. Bill Wallace

September 25, 1995

Moderator for the session was Dr. C. Ray Pruette. Forty-seven people, representing twenty-one churches, were present. Mr. Epp Catlett was appointed as Parliamentarian.

WMU Council Director Mrs. Lottie Lou Dickens reported that the goal of the Associational WMU Council is to have a WMU organization in every church in the association. Seven council members attended leadership training at Caraway in July. Bighty-five people attended the WMU Fall Workshop at Franklinton Baptist Church on September 5. The following churches having the most new WMU members were recognized: Flat Rock, First Place; Philadelphia, Second Place; and Sandy Creek and Franklinton tied for Third Place. A plaque was awarded to Flat Rock, and the book Risk the Journey was given to the other winners. During the Help Hunger Project, people in North Carolina gave the most cans of food. Tar River gave 1707 cans and \$432.25. For the Camp Mundo Vista Project, Tar River sent laborers and also gave \$175.00. An Associational WMU newsletter has been started. Tar River WMU will observe the Baptist Women's Day of Prayer on November 5, at the Ephesus Baptist Church. The WMU will participate again this year in the gift box project for the Women's Correctional Center in Rocky Mount.

Brotherhood Council Director Mr. Wayne Gupton announced the training for Baptist Men and RA leaders to be held at Red Bud Baptist Church on September 28. Discipleship Supporter Rev. Jody Griffin reported that nine are attending a six weeks "In God's Presence" study. In August the Discipleship Support Team

six weeks "In God's Presence" study. In August the Discipleship Support Team attended Caraway. "Calling All Christians" will be held on October 5, at Rock

Spring Baptist Church, and will focus on spiritual growth.

Music Council Director Miss Nanette Warren reported that four people attended the Music session at the Key Leadership Conference in August. The Associational Hymm Sing was held on September 24. A conference for Volunteer Music Directors will be held at Caraway on October 6 & 7. The churches of the Tar River Baptist Association have been invited to join a mass choir that will sing during revival on October 12, at the seminary. The Associational Christmas Caroling will be on December 21.

Finance Committee Chairperson Mrs. Annette Coppedge presented the financial report for August. She also presented the Proposed budget for 1996. A motion was made by Rev. Gary McNair to recommend the Proposed budget at the Fall Annual Meeting. The motion was seconded by Rev. Paul Douglas. After much discussion,

the vote carried.

Rev. Luis Maravi, Pastor at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads, reported that during the summer months approximately seventy to eighty people attended the services on Sunday and Wednesday. The three-months-trial period of a possible merger with the group from Rocky Mount is coming to a close. The Mission Development Council will meet soon to decide how to proceed. The goal of the mission is to be constituted as a church. The mission collected a State Missions Offering. Recently four adults were baptized. A fourth anniversary revival was held June 29-July 2. Twenty-nine adults and thirty children prayed to receive Christ during the revival. VBS was held July 29 and August 5. Fifty-nine children and youth attended VBS with eight teacher and helpers. A survey was done in the Franklinton area to assess the need for starting a new Hispanic Ministry.

Dr. Pruette gave the Associational Council Report with a recommendation that the Tar River Baptist Association participate in the new Partnership between North Carolina and South Africa. A motion to adopt the recommendation was made by

Rev. Gary McNair. The motion was seconded by Rev. Cecil Aldridge, and the vote carried.

Rev. Wallace announced that October and November are the months designated to collect new toys for the Associational Toy Store Ministry. Two stores would be operated again this year. He explained that the toy ministry is a vehicle for presenting Christ. Churches are encouraged to collect toys and then bring them to the store on stocking dates which are November 28-December 1, in Louisburg, and December 8-9, in Spring Hope. Volunteers are needed to be shopping aides and counselors. Pastors are urged to send names of people that need help for Christmas to the Associational Office by mid-November. After receiving the names of people that need help, the people are sent an invitation with a specific date and time to shop for free toys. After shopping each person is required to talk with a counselor, who shares the gospel with them. Afterwards a follow up letter is sent to the church of their choice. All shoppers receive a Bible and a The children also shop on certain days for gifts for their parents. each of the past years, we have served around 200 children. Shoppers are people that have been recommended by the pastors. We also get names from Social Services and from the Seminary. The two stores will be open for shopping as follows: in Louisburg, December 4-7, and in Spring Hope, December 11-14.

Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report, went over the suggested program agenda for the Fall Annual Meeting. A motion to adopt the program was made by Rev. Jody Griffin. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Elaine Lewis, and the vote carried.

Continuing his report, Rev. Wallace announced that the Listening Team from the Baptist State Convention will be visiting Tar River October 30-November 2.

Rev. Wallace concluded by reporting on the new Associational Building. is now dried-in. The plumbing is in place except for the fixtures, and the electrical wiring should be completed by the end of September. The current balance of the building fund is approximately \$4,000.00. A member of one of the churches in the association has recently donated \$5,000.00 worth of stock to be sold and used for the new building. The brick mason is ready to begin, but we need \$20,000.00 to pay him. From 1988 through September 19, 1995, we have received \$25,008.52 from 32 churches and \$35,213.10 from 40 individuals. So far 53 people have volunteered labor at the new building. A little sacrifice on the part of each church could see this project to completion. Rev. Wallace expressed his appreciation for all contributions and volunteers.

Dr. Pruette expressed his love to and appreciation of the members of the association during his tenure as moderator.

PROPOSED MINISTRY ACTION BUDGET FOR 1996

The purpose of the Tar River Baptist Association is to glorify God by assisting each of its participating congregations to be in fellowship, and to fulfill its mission, individually and together.

I. OPERATING EXPENSES: Services, utilities, and equipment are essential in assisting the association to fulfill its purpose. Although these things are not identified as ministries, they compliment and lend support to the ministries of the association.

\$	1,100.00	OFFICE SUPPLIES: Budget will provide necessary funds to adequately do the work of the association.
\$	2,000.00	POSTAGE: Postage will be provided for promotional mailings, other correspondence, and a few copies of "CURRENTS OF THE TAR."
\$	3,000.00	PRINTING: "CURRENTS OF THE TAR," letterheads, envelopes, and other printed forms and materials are essential to the work of the association.
\$	2,400.00	${\tt TELEPHONE:}\ {\tt Budget}\ provides\ {\tt telephones}\ {\tt to}\ {\tt facilitate}\ {\tt the}\ {\tt work}\ {\tt of}\ {\tt the}\ {\tt association.}$
Ş	5,160.00	OFFICE RENT: Monthly rental payments on the facility at Route 9, Louisburg, will be necessary until the new Associational Center has been constructed. Includes all utilities except telephone.
\$	1,100.00	SERVICE CONTRACT: Budget covers cost of contract on Cannon copier. The contract covers everything except paper and toner.

\$ 100.00	REPAIRS TO EQUIPMENT: This estimated amount is allocated since we do not know the extent of the repairs our equipment will need.
\$ 100.00	CUSTODIAL SUPPLIES: Cleaning supplies will be provided to maintain the Associational Center. Such items include cleaning materials, deodorizers, disinfectants, waxes, paper towels, toilet tissue, light bulbs, mops, brooms, rags, and other necessary items.
\$ 2,000.00	INSURANCE: Insurance coverage includes contents, liability, workman's compensation, malpractice, and bonding for the secretary, treasurer, and assistant treasurer.
\$ 300.00	COMPUTER SOFTWARE AND SUPPLIES: Necessary software and supplies will be provided for efficiency and effectiveness in the work of the association.
\$ 2,191.00	COPIER LEASE: Our lease agreement on the Cannon copier is paid with these funds.
\$ 325.00	ASSOCIATIONAL ANNUALS: Associational Annuals will be printed and distributed to the churches of the association. Churches requesting copies will be required to pay the printing cost of the copies they receive. The Association will provide copies to be mailed to certain institutions and agencies, and a sufficient number of copies to be filed and to be used with committees and new pastors or staff.
\$ 150.00	HOSPITALITY: The Director of Missions may access this fund to provide lodging, food, and other necessary hospitality for associational guests. He may also use these monies for breakfast, luncheon, or dinner meetings with pastors or lay persons that he feels are necessary to the work or fellowship of the association (including orientation sessions with new ministers or staff).
\$ 75.00	BIRTHDAY, ANNIVERSARY, AND SYMPATHY CARDS: Cards will be sent to each minister and each member of his family on the occasions of birthdays, anniversaries, and bereavement.
\$ 100.00	MEMORIALS: Budget is used to send flowers or other appropriate items at the death or serious illness of those who are serving in responsible places of leadership. Consideration will also be given to those who have served significantly in the past.
\$ 100.00	BANK SERVICE CHARGES: Money is allocated to cover normal banking services charges.
\$ 75.00	PETTY CASH: Twenty-five dollars is kept in the office to cover returned mail and other incidentals. The Secretary keeps receipts on all petty cash expenditures and is responsible for reconciling the petty cash fund.
\$ 20,276.00	Sub-total of Operating Expenses

II. PROMOTIONAL EXPENSES: We will endeavor to make the work of the Association and its churches highly visible throughout the area, and at the same time, provide a Christian witness.

- -0- RADIO AND TELEVISION: We will use both radio and television for special announcements and promotions.
- -0- NEWSPAPERS: Area newspapers will be utilized to advertise special events and promotions.
- -C- VOLUNTEERS APPRECIATION BANQUET: This banquet is a way to say "thank you," and to express appreciation to all who serve as volunteers in any facet of the Association's ministries.

- III. CHURCH DEVELOPMENT AND CHRISTIAN EDUCATION MINISTRIES: One of the primary reasons the Association exists is to serve and strengthen the churches. Part of our mission is to assist the churches in their educational programs. This is done in both program development and leadership training. Associational leaders interpret convention programs and assist churches in adapting these programs to meet their needs. Associational-wide training conferences, seminars, workshops, and other services will be provided to strengthen the work of the churches at the local level.

SUNDAY SCHOOL:

- -O- OUTREACH BIBLE STUDY: According to demographic data the Bunn Lake/Zebulon area has great potential for a new church start. We will attempt to promote at least one outreach Bible Study which is the initial step in trying to start a church there.
- \$ 50.00 ASSISTEAM TRAINING: The TRBA ASSISTeam will attend the state ASSISTeam Training Meeting to be held on February 2 and 3, at the First Baptist Church, Cary, North Carolina. These funds will provide gasoline for travel, and literature and materials our ASSISTeam will need to do their work.
- \$ 100.00 ASSOCIATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL TRAINING SCHOOL: This training event will provide an excellent opportunity for experienced and beginning Sunday School teachers and workers to get a better understanding of the characteristics and needs of the age-group with which they work. The dates of this school are September 26-27.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL:

- \$ 300.00 LITERATURE AND SUPPLIES: VBS literature and necessary supplies will be provided for those on our VBS Council.
- \$ 50.00 STATE CLINIC: Our VBS Council will travel together to the State VBS Training Clinic to be held in Greensboro on March 22. This allocation will cover travel expenses for our VBS Council.
- \$ 125.00 ASSOCIATIONAL VBS CLINICS: Three Vacation Bible School Clinics will be conducted. The first of these is our Early Bird Clinic, April 11. It is a dinner meeting and is for Pastors and VBS Directors only. Two additional clinics will be held for all VBS workers. The second of these is a repeat of the first, giving an option to the workers as to which one they want to attend. They are scheduled for May 9, and May 14.

DISCIPLESHIP TRAINING:

Such needed resources include new books, audio-visual materials, and supplies to catalog and maintain all associational owned media and media equipment.

Budget will provide gasoline and meals while in route to and from Caswell. Lodging will be provided by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. The dates are May 6-7.
- \$ 150.00 ASSOCIATIONAL KEY LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE: Key leaders from the churches of the association will be invited to attend this annual event.  - -0- LAKE ROYALE: Volunteers conduct services at Lake Royale each Sunday. This work is self-supporting.
 - -0BUNN PRISON: Sunday services are conducted each week of every other month. Bible studies are conducted weekly.
 All of this work is done by volunteers.
 - -0- LOUISBURG MANOR: Volunteers conduct services each Friday for the residents of this facility.
 - -0- CHRISTMAS TOY STORE: Churches of the Association provide toys and other items to be used to assist needy families at Christmas. Volunteers will conduct this ministry of care and evangelism during the month of December.
 - -0- LOCAL MISSIONS: A ministry to assist persons in crisis or critical need.
 - \$ 100.00 DIAPER CHANGE AND CUP OF COLD WATER MINISTRY: A tent or booth will be set up for mothers to change the diapers of their children. We will also make cold water available. Functions where this ministry will be performed include Louisburg's Tar River Festival (September 21), and Spring Hope's Pumpkin Festival (October 5).

1995 Report: Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina

Michael C. Blackwell, President

H. Lee Davis, Jr. Chairman of Trustees

For six-year-old Malinda, darkness brought sleepless nights listening to her mother's boyfriend beat her brother and sister - and praying she wouldn't be next, watching her mom choose her lover's whims over her children's needs, and finally, being abandoned on Christmas Eve in pouring rain on a dirt road.

Her darkness, more than just a light switch clicked off, swirled with pain, fear,

confusion, and despair.

Today, a bright-eyed teenager living at Broyhill Home, one of four Baptist Children's Homes residential campuses, Malinda finally sees light. After becoming a Christian in 1992, she can forgive her mom and let go of her painful past. "Learning to deal with my issues is a lot easier since I became a Christian, " said Malinda. "I'm happy here at Broyhill. The people believe in me, support me, and are here for me."

Believing in children and families, offering light to pierce their darkness has

been Baptist Children's Homes' goal since its beginning 110 years ago.

Serving 1,513 children and families in 1993-94 in 12 facilities across the state, BCH provides intentionalized programs of residential group care, emergency care, therapeutic camping, maternity care, teenage mother/babies, model day care and behavioral change for girls. Gaston County emergency care cottages in Dallas, operated on a yearly contract basis, were not renewed with BCH following Gaston County's decision to change the facilities' direction to a level of service BCH doesn't provide.

Commemorating 110 years of ministry, BCH published "Intent to Serve", a history

depicting the last decade of BCH's child-centered, family-focused services. Each

church was to receive a complimentary copy in the Fall of 1995.

Founded in 1970, the Baptist Maternity Home in Asheville celebrated in October, 25 years serving over 900 young, unmarried, pregnant women who were given a quiet,

supportive atmosphere to make decisions about their future.

A chapter of BCH life closed with the death of alumni, employee, and friend Bill Sisk. Investing 52 years of himself, Sisk, who came to Mills Home at age 8 and returned to work on staff 42 years, died May 21, 1995. "An era has passed," said BCH President Michael C. Blackwell. "It's extremely unlikely Baptist Children's Homes will ever see another individual who invests himself so fully in this place as did my friend Bill Sisk."

Adding to the light, Baptist churches, through the Cooperative Program, designated gifts and the Thanksgiving Offering funded about one-fourth of BCH's \$12 million budget

with gifts totaling \$2,934,304.

Trustee Jim Goldston held his sixth annual Goldston's Carnival for Children raising \$28,633 and providing two fun-packed days of rides, games, entertainment and food for children and area residents. "There is nothing more important in this life than children," said Goldston. "This is just one thing we can do to show our commitment, to put our feet to our prayers."

Putting words into action described numerous individuals who gave time and effort

with special campus work projects.

This year, the Friends of Children committee added a twist to their annual spring bus tour by pulling on gloves and work clothes to help beautify Odum Home in Pembroke

and Cameron Boys Camp near Southern Pines.

A team of volunteers from Denver Baptist Church worked at Broyhill Home clearing brush, painting inside a cottage and building a storage shed; and at Kennedy Home tearing down an old gym built in the 1930's, restructuring an old picnic shelter into an arts and crafts center, removing old heating equipment from Biggs cottage and renovating family conference rooms in the new gym.

"We pray about these kids, and we pray that we will be an example," said Allen Holmes, Denver Baptist's mission trip coordinator. "This is more important than any

building or construction work.'

Trustees, intent on strengthening BCH's leadership position and continuing its tradition of giving light to families and children, approved a \$10.1 million campaign, "Light Their Way," to raise money for special projects, operational needs and endowment. The campaign will run September 1995-May 1997.

Many children, like Malinda, suffer in darkness. Many families linger in pain waiting for answers, waiting for help. Because of Baptists' support, BCH is able to

"Light Their Way," offering hope, security, and love.

NC Baptist Hospitals, Inc.: 1995 Report to the Associations "Meeting the Challenges of Health Care"

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care at affordable prices.

"THE BAPTIST"

Affectionately known to many simply as "The Baptist," our hospital now employs 5,544 members who comprise our healing team. We are joined with Bowman Gray School of Medicine and thus The Medical Center has over 9,000 employees making us the largest employer in Forsyth County. In fiscal year 1994-95, our 806-bed facility provided care for 23,712 inpatient admissions. Our rapidly growing Outpatient Department provided care for 557,511 patient visitors.

A NEW DIVISION: PASTORAL CARE AND CHURCH RELATIONS

In May restructuring created a new division with the consolidation of the departments of Pastor Care and Church/Community Relations. This division consists of four ministry components which are listed below with a brief ministry synopsis:

Department of Chaplaincy and Pastoral Education

Through spiritual and emotional healing to patients, families and staff, approximately 55,000 ministries were provided by our chaplains.

The Center For Congregational Health

This rapidly expanding ministry to churches, pastors and staff, and congregational leaders also enable the training of intentional interim pastors. Also, training is provided for leadership and church consultants. Workshops and other events are held as well.

Department Of Church And Denominational Relations

This department serves as the liaison between Baptist Hospital and the churches, associations, conventions, as well as other church groups. By facilitating appointments, policy interpretation, understanding of our healthcare services, this function helps keep our vital bond with North Carolina Baptists strong. Mission dollars for benevolent care through this department in excess of \$452,000 were given by Baptists to the Mother's Day Offering. This mission effort helps relieve the financial burdens of patients who have little or no healthcare insurance. This is truly a ministry of renewing hope in their lives and is a source of great joy for us.

Pastoral Counseling

With increasing requests from churches and associations across the state, this ministry continues to expand. Our thirteen strategically located counseling centers provided 27,000 ministry hours last year.

POINTS OF EXCELLENCE AND PROGRESS

>Financial Stewardship - Annually Baptist Hospital's rate increases consistently are less than both the medical consumer price index for hospitals and general inflation. The most recent NC Database Commission report comparing the average of charges at other instate academic medical centers for our most frequent diagnoses reveals our charges are 21 percent lower. For all hospitals statewide we are 7.7 percent lower on those same charges, despite treating the most critically ill patients from across the state. >QualChoice Of North Carolina - A managed care plan providing quality healthcare and patient physician choice. Established by the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated and Bowman Gray School of Medicine and Wake Forest University, QualChoice is now expanding to employers in our region. >Accreditation With Commendation - This distinction was awarded us by the Joint

PACCREGITATION WITH Commendation - This distinction was awarded us by the Joint Commission of Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. With a grade of 96, we earned the distinction as one of America's most highly rated hospitals.

>Emergency Department/Dietary Building - With a Fall 1995 opening date this 300,000 square foot facility will expand our Emergency Department capacity to 70,000 visitors annually. It will also house a 35-bed Day Hospital, as well as a 900-seat cafeteria, and will double the proportion of private beds available to patients.

>Comprehensive Outpatient Rehabilitation Facility - A 64,000 square foot facility scheduled for completion in the Summer of 1996.

>Sticht Center Of Aging And Rehabilitation - Housing a geriatric research and education center, geriatric day hospital and inpatient acute rehab beds, gero-psychiatry, and adult acute psychiatry, a planned completion and opening date for this center is the

Spring of 1996.

>Home Health Solutions And Home Health Specialists - Specialists provide at home care such as intravenous chemotherapy, pain management, nursing care, and physical and occupational therapy.

>Community Hospital Assistance - Baptist Hospital continue to develop relationships with hospitals and physicians in other communities inviting them to join our expanding healthcare delivery system.

A CLOSING WORD

Historical methods of delivering healthcare are changing in significant ways. We are constantly seeking to position ourselves to develop the methodologies, services, and delivery systems to meet these challenges. In the midst of the multiplicity of changes remain several treasured, time tested constants. Among these are our commitment to excellence and compassion in providing care, the demonstrated support of NC Baptists, and most significantly, the providence of our Lord. Trusting in these, we move forward boldly and confidently into the future.

Baptist Retirement Homes of NC, Inc. "Making Life for Older Adults . . . The Best of Times"

As a result of the wonderful support given by North Carolina Baptists, 1995 will be remembered as one of the finest years in the forty-four year history of the Baptist Retirement Homes of NC, Inc. The following are some highlights from the year:

In recognition of its commitment to the spiritual well-being of the residents that it serves, Baptist Retirement Homes hired Luther Osment of Sylva, NC as its first full-time Chaplain. Rev. Osment's work responsibilities include ministry to the residents of the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem and the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville.

Reaffirming its commitment to the idea that retirement should be a "step up" for Older Adults, the final phase of the renovation of The Taylor House Facility in Albemarle was completed in the Fall of 1995. The renovation of The Hamilton Baptist Home in Martin County was also begun in 1995 and hopefully will be completed by year end. When the renovation of The Hamilton Baptist Home is completed, all of the facilities operated by the Baptist Retirement Homes will be "state-of-the-art."

In recognition of the changing profile of institutionalized Older Adults (47 percent of the "oldest old" in North Carolina suffer from some form of dementia), the Young Solarium addition was completed in the Fall of 1995. The Young Solarium will house a new small-group program designed to enhance the quality of life experienced by institutionalized Older Adults suffering from dementia.

In an effort to provide Older Adults with affordable care, a sub-acute unit was developed at the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem . . . a unit where frail Older Adults can receive IV therapy, infusion, wound care, and stroke and bone fracture rehabilitation outside of a hospital setting.

In response to the need to provide quality long-term care services to the ever growing number of frail Baptist Older Adults who may not need institutionalized care, the Baptist Retirement Homes developed a new home and community based service program, In Home Care, Inc. . . . the new service designed primarily to extend the amount of time that frail Baptist Older Adults can remain in the home environment.

North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. 1995 Annual Report

The messengers present at the Baptist State convention meeting 75 years ago, when the establishment of the Baptist Foundation was approved, believed that the services to be provided by the Foundation could benefit both the individuals who would use its services as well as Christian purposes for which the Convention had organized many years earlier.

With a well trained and dedicated staff, the Baptist Foundation is now in position to assist any Baptist church member who has a desire to preserve their estate for their families and provide greater financial service to their church, association, missions, Baptist institutions or the Convention in its program of work.

Those who have become involved with the Foundation thus far, many of whom no longer are alive today are providing critically needed resources for either their family members and/or the Christian causes they dearly love. In many instances their use of a trust or endowment fund has helped reduce income and/or estate taxes and increased the value of assets they left for their families at their death. addition, they continue to provide for sharing the Gospel with the income from endowment funds they created while they were living.

Many North Carolina Baptists are today enjoying the benefits of increased retirement income through the creation of an annuity trust with the transfer of property or other assets which the Foundation sold and invested under guidance of professional managers. When these trusts were created, the individuals were provided tax benefits which enhanced their estates. In most cases, the income they now receive is greater than that received prior to starting the trust. At some future date of their choosing, the assets in trust will serve the Lord in ways chosen by the donors.

During the past year, an area manager was employed to serve the western portion of the state. A twelve-minute video, "Pillars of the Church", was prepared which shares through personal example how the Foundation can serve every church member. The total assets under management by the Foundation at the end of 1994 were \$47,312,575. A total of \$1,241,756 was paid to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes during 1994. The amount paid to individuals from trusts, which will eventually pay to Baptist causes, was \$1,499,098 during the year. During the first six months of 1995, the total performance of the charitable endowment funds under management was 15.3 percent (annualized).

The Biblical Recorder should be in every Baptist home in North Carolina. support as a subscriber and reader, coupled with your encouragement to others, will enable the paper to better serve the constituency with accurate and helpful information.

In order to save churches large amounts of money and to increase the readership of the Recorder, Church News Service (CNS) was launched in 1990. This system lets any congregation have their church news incorporated into the <u>Biblical Recorder</u> which saves staff time, postage and printing costs. Usually, for less than what it costs to produce the church newsletter, CNS gives the entire Baptist communication package to each family in the congregation. Recent and anticipated increases in mailing costs makes CNS a greater value in 1995-96 than when it was started in 1990.

The paper focuses more and more attention on North Carolina Baptists with news, features and inspirational articles which will encourage individuals and churches in their witness and ministry. One sure way to conquer problems and overcome the barriers to effective witness and ministry is to have the facts, know the issues and be adequately informed. With all the stress and disturbance in the world, "The North Carolina Baptist Way' had become even more important to us than ever before.

1995 Baptist College/University Report

The Baptist State Convention is 165 years old. For 161 of those years the Convention has been in the business of founding, adopting, supporting, and nurturing Baptist colleges and universities. North Carolina Baptist are known for their broad and deep commitment to Christian higher education. Our seven Convention-related education institutions are: Campbell University, Chowan College, Gardner-Webb University, Mars Hill College, Meredith College, Wingate University, and Wake Forest University.

For 1995 The Convention's Christian higher education budget is \$6,000,540 or 20.41 percent of the total. These funds are divided among six colleges. Wake Forest is not in the budget, but receives designated gifts from churches and shares in student financial aid funding through the State Missions Offering.

The 1994 enrollment in North Carolina Baptist colleges and universities was 22,473 with 4,075 graduates. Approximately 476 students were enrolled in church-related vocation studies.

Gardner-Webb University - School Of Divinity Report to the Baptist Associations

Thank you for the interest, prayer, and support as we have begun the Gardner-Webb University School of Divinity. Let me report our progress to this point by answering the questions we are most often asked.

What is a School of Divinity? Is it purely academic in contrast to the professional

education offered by seminaries?

Our purpose is to provide professional education for Christian ministry in a local church. We also help student ministers shape their ministry through courses such as models for ministry, Christian spirituality and religion and personality. Each student meets regularly with a mentor/teacher. We also offer courses in professional areas such as preaching, teaching, worship leadership, church administration, organizational leadership, counseling, evangelism, and pastoral care. You can see that we balance classical disciplines with knowledge of practical church leadership and continued personal growth.

The name "school of Divinity" is usually used when a ministerial education is ted by a university. The word "seminary" usually describes a free-standing offered by a university.

institution.

Why offer ministerial education in a university?

As a university affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, we can provide an excellent ministerial education based on historic Baptist principles. From the beginning we can enjoy the resources of the university such as the programs for the deaf and/or blind students, and masters level studies in other areas such as psychology and business.

How many students do you have?

The School of Divinity is off to a good start. The first semester (Spring 1993) we enrolled 23 students. The fall and spring semesters of our first full year we had 51 students. Projections for enrollment for the fall indicate that we will continue to arow.

Who are your teachers?

Faculty members with long experience such as Dr. Donald E. Cook in New Testament, Dr. Roy B. Wyatt in Old Testament, and Dr. Robert Lamb in church administration form a core full-time faculty. Dr. Albert Meiburg directs Clinical Pastoral Education. Other faculty from the university and from churches and agencies along with missionaries in residence also teach.

How are you doing financially?

The strength of the university has helped us launch the School of Divinity. are grateful for the Theological Education Grants the Baptist State Convention of NC has made available. Many churches and individuals have helped us. The Christian Service Organization is engaged in a drive to secure additional scholarships. Where do you stand theologically?

We take the Bible seriously, believing its message about sin, salvation, and grace should be applied to every aspect of life. We take a traditional, inclusive Baptist approach, welcoming both men and women who answer God's call to prepare with us.

Christian Action League of NC, Inc. 1995 Annual Report To The Associations

This year has been a significant one for the Christian Action League of NC as we gave leadership and support to local communities in their battle against the proliferation of alcohol, provided a voice for Christian morals and ethics in the halls of the legislature and continued our battle against on-going legislation concerning the lottery and other anti-family issues. Legislative Issues:

A. Alcohol

The alcohol industry sought to implement state-wide Liquor-By-the-Drink and beer/wine sales through legislative action. House Bill 599 would have implemented LBD without a vote of the people. The Christian Action League prompted churches to action and strong opposition developed from across the state, the bill was withdrawn and died in committee.

B. Lottery

In the 1995 Session of the General Assembly, there were four lottery bills introduced. Several times in the past decade, gambling forces were able to secure the passage of a lottery measure in the Senate, but not in 1995. Lottery legislation was defeated in the Senate by a 28-20 vote. In the House, HB 838 838 (Lottery for School Buildings) was brought out of committee by an unusual parliamentary move and placed on the House calendar. Calls and prayers from CAL members and the Christian community were honored when the measure was sent back to committee where it remained until the end of session.

We praise the Lord for this victory and for the fact that NC remains the largest state in the nation that has no state-sponsored lottery. However, we request your prayers as the Christian Action League will continue to be on the front-line fighting this battle again in 1996.

C. Abortion

The Christian Action League and other Christian organizations have continuously lobbied for abolition of the state abortion fund. House Bill 229 has passed and will cut the abortion funding from \$1.2 million to \$50,000 and then to be used only in cases of rape or incest.

For many years we have been working for legislation requiring Parental Consent before a minor can obtain an abortion. House Bill 481 was adopted this year

providing this "common sense" legislation.

D. Abstinence Education

Another proposal that the Christian Action League has been working on became law this year. House Bill 834 (Teaching Abstinence Until Marriage) is profamily and supports Biblical and moral values. This bill requires schools to offer a program encouraging abstinence until marriage and also provides for parental review of teaching materials before comprehensive sex education instruction can be implemented.

Rev. Johnny R. Henderson became the League's Executive Director in July upon the retirement of Coy C. Privette. Johnny brings a wealth of experience to this position. A trustee since 1977, he is the NC Baptist Men's Correctional Ministries Coordinator and serves on the Executive Committee of Prison Fellowship of NC. Also, his church was

featured on ABC News last year for its outstanding prison ministry.

We are grateful to God for the prayer and financial support that the League receives from the churches of your association. May others join you as we seek to be the "Salt and Light" in a world hostile to Biblical ethics and morality.



AFTERNOON SESSION

(Note from Clerk: Some reports are not printed in the Proceedings, but are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

- 1. The 166th Semi-Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Moderator Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church.
- 2. Mr. Jason Taylor, Cedar Rock Baptist Church, led in singing the hymn, "Forward Through the Ages."
- 3. Rev. Leo Lowery, Red Bud Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
- 4. Moderator Gary McNair organized the session, and appointed Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock Baptist Church, as Parliamentarian.
- 5. Vice-Moderator Adolphus Batchelor, Holly Grove Baptist Church, presented the proposed program and made a motion that the printed program be adopted with the following changes: a report from the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee will be given during miscellaneous business, and an offering for the new building fund will be received in the afternoon and evening sessions. The vote carried.
- 6. New pastors and staff were recognized by Director of Missions Bill Wallace as follows: Rev. Jon Dorsey, Pastor, Sandy Creek Baptist Church; Rev. Jason Taylor, Minister of Music/Youth, Cedar Rock Baptist Church; Rev. Scott Taylor, Minister of Music, Franklinton Baptist Church; and Rev. Tom Eldridge, Pastor, Bunn Baptist Church.
- 7. The histories of the host churches were presented by Ms. Joan Wood of Red Bud, Miss Irma Gupton of Mount Zion, and Mr. Lloyd West of Sandy Creek.
 - 8. Mr. Jason Taylor led in singing the hymn, "Our Hope is in the Living God."
- 9. Mr. Bob Shrewsbury, NC Baptist Men Division of the Baptist State Convention, extended an invitation to tour the medical/dental bus. He explained that many professionals in health/dental care volunteer their time on the bus. The bus will go to a church and help people in the area. Afterwards the church has the opportunity to do follow up evangelism. The bus also goes to migrant fields. The bus is equipped with water and power. People who need help are offered a service and a witness. Mr. Shrewsbury shared his testimony of experiences while driving the bus.
- 10. Rev. Bill Wallace, Director of Missions, presented the new Bylaws for Bylaw Committee Chairman Terry Alford, Ephesus Baptist Church. The new Bylaws conform to the requirements of an incorporation. Basically few changes have been made in the new Bylaws: some wording and arrangement, and the December Board meeting changed to November (per vote by the Board). Interim Pastor Gerald Riggs, Philadelphia Baptist Church, made a motion to adopt the new Bylaws. The motion was seconded by Dr. C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church, and the vote carried.
- 11. Rev. Paul Douglas, Cedar Rock Baptist Church, presented the report from the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee. He made a motion that the recommendation be accepted. The vote carried.
- 12. Announcements were made by Moderator Gary McNair.
- 13. Rev. Scott Taylor, Franklinton Baptist Church, presented special music.
- 14. Rev. Bill Wallace gave his Director of Missions' report. In keeping with the theme, he described a "dream association." He indicated that a lot of hard work was needed for dreams to come true.
- 15. Following prayer by Rev. Larry Williams, Louisburg Baptist Church, an offering was collected for the new building fund.
- 16. Interim Pastor Gerald Riggs read scripture and led in prayer.
- 17. Mr. Jason Taylor presented special music.

- 18. Rev. Norris Cook, Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church, preached the annual sermon.
- 19. Rev. Bill Haley, Mount Zion Baptist Church, gave thanks for the evening meal.

EVENING SESSION

- 1. Following a mini-concert by a variety of instrumentalists and a choir composed of Pastors and Ministers of Music, Rev. Jon Dorsey, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
- 2. Mrs. Sandra Wood, Red Bud Baptist Church, led in singing the hymn, "Open My Eyes."
- 3. Mr. Pete Colbert, Franklinton Baptist Church, presented the financial report.
- 4. Mrs. Wendy Edwards, FBC, Spring Hope, gave the Discipleship report. A strategy meeting was held in January, with another planned for May. Twelve children and two youth from Beulah, Oak Grove, Sandy Creek, and Spring Hope participated in the Associational Bible Drill. Seven pastors were involved in the study "Witnessing Through Your Relationships." Following the report by Mrs. Edwards, the Discipleship Support Team presented several children who told what they were thankful for. Miss Amanda Powell, Columbus Association, presented special music. As a token of appreciation, the Discipleship Support Team distributed candy to all present.
- 5. Sunday School Council Director Shelby Stephens, Pilot Baptist Church, announced the State Key Leadership Conference to be held at Caswell in May.
- 6. VBS Council Director Jenny Alford, Ephesus Baptist Church, announced the two VBS Clinics to be held in May.
- 7. WMU Leadership Team Director Lottie Lou Dickens, Ephesus Baptist Church, reported that eighty-five people attended the Annual WMU Spring Meeting on April 1. The guest speaker for the meeting was Eric Raddatz, NC Baptist AIDS Partnership. Church WMU organizations obtaining the goal of "Distinguished" on the Achievement Guide are Social Plains (14 years), Ephesus (13 years), and Flat Rock (1 year). Philadelphia WMU obtained the goal of "Standard" (1 year). At the WMU Spring meeting each of these churches were presented a book written by Barbara Joiner. Kathy Braswell was elected as the new Associational WMU Director. Mrs. Dickens reported that several WMU organizations had collected food boxes for famine stricken Korea. She announced that health kits and refreshments were needed at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads. A GA Mother/Daughter Day Camp will be held in May.
- 8. Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton, Red Bud Baptist Church, reported that in the basketball league Pilot and White Level were the winning teams. The Best Christian Attitude Award was given to the Strickland's Crossroads Hispanic Mission Team. The RA Car Derby was held in March at the Union Chapel Baptist Church. At the State Lad/Crusader Congress Tar River did well. At the Associational Track Meet Poplar Springs had the most team points. Nineteen teams participated in the Benefit Golf Tournament, raising \$915.88 for the new building fund. Mr. Gupton announced that Tar River had received help from the NC Baptist Men this year. The Disaster Team helped when the tornado struck in Pilot and Pine Ridge. The Baptist Men helped with the construction of the Sims Baptist Church. Mr. Gupton encouraged churches to give a little extra to the NC State Missions Offering to be collected in September. The total budget for the state WMU and Baptist Men will be funded by the State Missions Offering. The money is needed to carry on mission work. He suggested that the mission groups promote this offering and try to raise funds towards this offering.
- 9. Mrs. Sandra Wood led in singing the hymn, "Follow On."
- 10. Following prayer by Rev. Billy Tharrington, Beulah Christian Baptist Church, an offering was received for the new building fund.
- 11. The Resolutions Committee Report was given by Rev. Jody Griffin, FBC, Spring Hope as follows:

Whereas, Red Bud Baptist Church has graciously provided her facilities for the use of the 1996 Semi-Annual Meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association, and

Whereas, Sandy Creek and Mount Zion Baptist Churches have offered assistance to Red Bud Baptist Church in the service of this meeting;

Be it therefore resolved, that we express our heartfelt appreciation to all who have worked to insure our comfort and to provide a delicious meal during this spring session.

Whereas, Rev. Bill Wallace and Mrs. Georgette Guin have continually provided exemplary Christian service on behalf of the Tar River Baptist Association, and Whereas, their service has been effective in leading member churches to cooperatively serve the cause of Christ:

Be it therefore resolved, that we acknowledge the contributions of the Association staff with sincere gratitude to God for their commitment to our churches and for their tireless efforts on behalf of all Tar River Baptists.

Whereas, the messengers and guests of the 1996 Semi-Annual Meeting of the Tar River Association met in business session and joined in worship with a theme of "Dream Something New;"

Be it therefore resolved, that we covenant together on this date, April 29, 1996 to avail ourselves to God for a vision of our future endeavors as an association and to support and encourage one another in our collective efforts to fulfill the Great Commission.

Rev. Griffin made a motion to adopt the resolutions, and the vote carried.

- 12. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reporting for the Credentials Committee, said that attendance at the Spring 1996 meeting was as follows: thirty churches and one mission represented by eighty-two messengers, six alternates, twenty-two pastors, nine associational officers, 40 guests (in the association) and five guests (outside the association) for a total of 164 people.
- 13. Rev. Gary McNair announced that the van at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads needed transmission work. The van is much needed by the mission and any one knowing of someone who might fix the van should contact Luis Maravi or the associational office.
- $14.\$ Miss Nanette Warren, Pilot Baptist Church, announced the Music School to be held in July.
- 15. The choir made up of Pastors and Ministers of Music presented special music.
- 16. Dr. George Shore, NC Baptist State Convention, brought the message.
- 17. The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Gary McNair.

HISTORY OF RED BUD BAPTIST CHURCH

Red Bud Baptist Church was organized at Lawrence's Meeting House the Saturday before the first Sunday in October 1823. In its early history, Red Bud was a member of the Kehukee Association of Halifax County. Through disagreements concerning missions the church was one of eight who left this association to join four churches of the Raleigh Association to form the Tar River Association in 1830.

The land (approximately four acres) was given to the church by the Jim Nick Sills' Family of Nash County. The church building, a wood structure, is located one half mile north of the creek from which it got its name. The 1921 edition of the History of the Tar River Association mentions that Red Bud was constituted by members of Sandy Creek. Many of our earlier records were lost in a fire at Wake Forest College in the early 1900's.

In 1855, a Sunday School was organized with eight officers and thirty-five pupils. The same year the membership was 106. By 1867, that number had grown to 203. The church began to help support state and foreign missions in 1878. P.H. Pernell served as pastor through 1883.

- J.A. Pitchford served as pastor from 1884 until 1889. In 1884 the Sunday School had seventy-four pupils with fifty average attendance. Mission gifts were still strong for education and orphanages. The pastor's salary was \$125.00 per year.
- J. A. Bridges was pastor from 1890 until 1891. The membership was 204. In 1892 A.A. Pippins came as pastor and Red Bud had thirty-one baptisms, the largest in its history. T.S. Collie, who resided in the Cedar Rock Community, walked to Red Bud and served as superintendent of Sunday School for many years. A.A. Pippins was pastor through 1897. The church maintained 223 members during this period.

In 1898 C.C. Williams came as pastor and served until 1900 or 1901. Preaching was held the second Sunday. J.E. Hoeutt came in 1902 as pastor. The Sunday School had 115 enrolled.

The basic structure of the present wood building was completed in 1906. At that time a new pulpit was added, and the first organ was purchased. A.G. Wilcox was pastor.

G.M. Duke came to Red Bud as pastor in 1909 and served through 1914. In 1914 there were 233 members with eighty-nine enrolled in Sunday School. A.G. Wilcox again served as pastor from 1916 through 1920.

In 1921 A.N. Corpening came and served two years as pastor. A Baptist Young People's Union was organized with twenty-one enrolled. The Lord's Supper was held quarterly. A twelve month Sunday School was begun.

In 1925 C.L. Gillispie came and served as pastor through 1927. During his pastorate a building committee was named, and progress was made toward remodeling the building.

Charles Howard came as pastor in 1928 and served two years. During his stay the building was completed. The church had six Sunday School rooms and faced Highway 58. In 1929, we had 182 members with an average attendance of seventy-five.

Julius Hopkins, John Walton, and Charles Gillispie filled the pulpit from 1930 until 1932. E.F. Walker accepted the pastorate in September 1932 and served until 1934. The total budget for this year was \$300.00.

John Edwards was pastor in 1935. He served a field of five churches: Centerville, Red Bud, Hickory Rock, Sandy Creek, and Mount Zion. During his pastorate the Unified Budget Plan was approved.

Paul Childers became pastor of Red Bud in 1944. Our first central heating system was installed and three new Sunday School rooms were added.

R. Eugene Owens accepted the pastorate in November 1951. He served until 1956. During this period, we purchased two acres of land from W.G. Lancaster of Castalia for the purpose of changing our driveway and establishing our cemetery.

Gattis Perry accepted the pastorate in October 1956 and served until February 1960. During his stay, we remodeled the pulpit and added hardwood floors in the sanctuary.

James Howard Pernell came to serve as pastor in June 1960. In March 1961, Robert R. Boone accepted the pastorate. During his ministry many improvements were made: two new restrooms were installed, a new organ and piano were purchased, a porch was added to the building, and new carpet was installed. We also purchased a tractor and mower.

Everette Parson came to Red Bud in May 1964. He served as pastor until October 1965. Mr. Parson was waiting for appointment by the Foreign Mission Board. He left for Ecuador shortly after leaving Red Bud.

James Estep was elected and accepted the call to serve as pastor in April 1966. He serve three years. The Estep family was the first to occupy our new parsonage.

R.E. Hatcher came to Red Bud in July 1969 and served as pastor until June 1971. The church membership in 1970 was 205. We gave \$1,027.00 to missions in that year.

Glenn Fassanella came to Red Bud on August 7, 1971. During his pastorate we remodeled the inside of the sanctuary. Our 150th anniversary was observed.

Harold Beam accepted the pastorate in June 1974. Our educational building was completed. The Tar River Association met at Red Bud this year.

Ralph Hooker became pastor of the church May 5, 1976. While Mr. Hooker was here, we adopted the Family Ministry Plan.

Burke Holland came to supply for us from June 1980 until December 1980. Sunday, January 4, 1981, Norman Philbeck was ordained as pastor. We purchased a van and our baptistery was installed during this period.

Allen Leo Lowery preached his first sermon as pastor June 2, 1985. Under his leadership fifty-four people have been baptized and forty-eight members have been by letter. The average Sunday School attendance has steadily increased from ninety-five in 1985 to 151 in 1995. Three new classes were started in 1994.

In 1987 we renovated our parsonage and added three rooms and a garage.

In 1989 a building fund was started for future expansion. To help this fund grow, in 1993 we began holding spring and fall fund raisers. In 1994 the educational building was renovated. In October 1995, the existing sanctuary was enlarged and two new restrooms were built.

In 1991 the church purchased 11.11 acres of land in front of the church from Louisburg Hardwood Company.

In July 1995 playground equipment was purchased and set up for the nursery and preschool children.

We endeavor to meet the spiritual needs of our membership and to encourage service to others. Therefore mission groups play a big role at Red Bud. At the present time we have active groups in each age level of the WMU and Brotherhood organizations. These groups lead our church in numerous mission projects throughout the year. Several members of our RAs and Brotherhood have been on mission trips which include the Netherlands, Spain, and New York.

We cannot close this history without paying tribute to our Lord and those soldiers of the cross who in leaner years paved the way for us today at Red Bud Baptist Church. May the work we do today be as beneficial to future generations.

HISTORY OF MOUNT ZION BAPTIST CHURCH

Mount Zion Baptist Church, located on a high hill in the Gold Sand Community, was organized April 19, 1862, by twenty-nine former members of Sandy Creek Baptist Church and aptly named after the Biblical Mount Zion, "the city of our God."

The first church building was a one-room wooden structure, built on the present site near Laurel Mill. In 1899, the church outgrew the original building, which was then torn down and the present sanctuary erected. Remodeling work on the sanctuary was done in 1925-26, and a small auditorium with Sunday School classrooms were added. In 1983-85, the roof was replaced and vinyl siding installed. Renovations during 1994-95, included the addition of outside illumination, a handicap ramp, and a cemetery driveway. Steel entrance doors are being installed. A parsonage was completed in 1969, and the fellowship hall was built in 1981-82.

The solid oak with a walnut finish pews were acquired from a church in New Bern. These have been padded for comfort. The pulpit furniture is also solid oak with walnut finish and was crafted by Orrus Rich of Raleigh. The church collection plates were crafted from Myrtle wood which grows only in the Middle East and were acquired from a speciality shop.

In 1863, just one year after the church's founding, the thirty-fourth annual session of the Tar River Baptist Association was held at Mount Zion. The Association also met at Mount Zion in 1884, 1924, and 1943.

The Sunday School was started in 1877, with forty members. By 1987 the membership had grown to 193. Mount Zion's Woman's Missionary Society was formed in 1902, and the Baptist Training Union in 1920. An active Brotherhood, as well as the Christian Women's Circle, provides tapes of the worship services for those unable to attend.

In 1985, the church established a Scholarship fund for worthy students. The Howard-Dark Scholarship trust fund is endowed jointly by the church and the Howard Fund of Buies Creek, founded by a former pastor.

The history of Mount Zion Baptist Church and the dedication of so many people over the years provide a challenge for the church's future: to continue to grow in its ministry, and to remain deeply rooted in the faith that has brought it thus far.

HISTORY OF SANDY CREEK BAPTIST CHURCH

Sandy Creek Baptist Church began in the early 1700's. Records indicate that as early as 1743, representatives were sent to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to determine how they might start a church in this area. In 1755, the church was established. The exact date of origin is difficult to determine because our history is closely entwined with that of our mother church, Reedy Creek. William Walker, who became pastor of Reedy Creek in 1746, was also the first pastor of Sandy Creek. The original church's "Faith and Covenant" is dated December 6, 1755, in what was then Granville County.

The first church was called the Meeting House at Sandy Creek, and it was later known as the Church of Christ at Sandy Creek. The first church building was a log house located

north of the present highway and east of the creek. In 1744, the same year the First Continental Congress met, the Sandy Creek congregation bought property for this building. The original building burned in 1822, and was rebuilt at the new site in 1824. The present building was constructed on this site in 1896.

During the 1800's, testimonies of members were vital to the church. The records indicate Christian concern for erring church members, efforts to restore these members to proper conduct, and forgiveness for their past actions. In 1826, a revival was held by the pastor, William B. Worrell, and seventy-six were baptized. Later, seventy-two more were baptized. Pastor Worrell baptized more than 350 new Christians before his death in 1832.

The Tar River Baptist Association was organized at Sandy Creek in 1831. The Association's Centennial was held there in 1931, and Sesquicentennial in 1981. Many of our church members have held leadership positions in the association over the years. Most recently were Gerald Nelms, moderator in 1989 and 1990, and Georgette Guin, secretary/clerk since 1991.

By 1844, the church membership consisted of 106 white members and sixteen black members. In 1862, twelve members were given letters of dismission to organize a church at Mt. Zion, and in 1906, another twelve members were granted letters of dismission to organize a church at Dickens, later to become White Level Baptist Church. Currently, we have 489 resident members and 112 non-resident members, with 252 enrolled in Sunday School.

In 1954, the church called its first full-time pastor and constructed a pastorium. Plans for the construction of an educational building were begun in 1959. This building was completed in 1963.

In 1940, Wednesday night prayer services began. In 1952, evening worship services began. In April 1972, the Bus Ministry was initiated. In August 1974, the church voted to begin a Children's Church to minister to the increased number of children.

The WMU has been an active organization over the years. Currently we have an enrollment of fifty-three members (Mission Friends, GAs, Acteens, BYW, and Baptist Women.) We've had two groups of Acteens Activators. In 1993, the Activators went on a mission trip to Cherokee, NC; and in 1994, to Supply, NC. In 1994, the WMU was recognized as a "distinguished" organization (per the achievement guide) for six consecutive years.

The Brotherhood was organized in 1988. Currently, we have an enrollment of twenty-two members. The Brotherhood organization began an on-going food pantry project in 1989, which is still meeting needs in the community today.

In 1989, four of our members went on an Associational Mission trip to Brazil. In 1992, a group of youth and adults went on a mission trip to Emerald Isle, NC.

In 1992, a reception was held in honor of Lloyd West for his faithful service as our music director for thirty-seven years.

In 1995 and 1996 a group of children participated in the Associational Bible Drills. In 1995, we called our current pastor, Rev. Jon Dorsey, and our current Minister of Youth, Rev. Joe Bufford.

The talent and dedication of our membership have resulted in physical and spiritual growth marking Sandy Creek Baptist Church as a dynamic force in this community.

THE REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

For more than nine years it has been my joy to serve this association as Director of Missions. These have been happy and productive years. As I reflect on them, my heart is filled with gratitude to God and appreciation to the Tar River Baptist Family for all that has been accomplished.

We are FAMILY! Like any family, we have experienced joys and sorrows. We have loved, laughed, and cried together. We have also prayed, played, planned, and proclaimed Jesus Christ together. There is no doubt that our Lord has blessed us. It is easy to look through this "Book of Reports" and see illustrations of His blessings, both physical and spiritual.

The purpose of the Tar River Baptist Association is to glorify God by assisting each of our participating congregations to be in fellowship, and to fulfill its mission, individually and together. In addition, we seek to build and maintain a Christian

fellowship as nearly like the pattern of the New Testament as possible. Furthermore, we endeavor to build into community life the way of the kingdom of God. We continually strive to strengthen the work of all of our churches at the local level. We rejoice as the Word of God is preached and as people believe and come to follow Christ. It delights us to observe our churches nurturing Christian personality and providing growth opportunities. It thrills us to see our people involved in partnership missions in such places as West Virginia, South Carolina, New York, Togo, Belize, Brazil, and South Africa.

One of our long-time family dreams is about to become a reality -- the completion of a new associational resource center. This beautiful new facility is a witness to the fact that God answers prayer. - 2. To help congregations relate to each other in a growing and mutually supportive fellowship within the family of believers in Christ,
- 3. To help congregations emphasize the biblical imperative to equip the saints by discipling believers and by calling out the called,
- 4. To help congregations fulfill the Great Commission through missions education, greater missions involvement, and increased missions giving,
- 5. To help congregations know the direction of, and be involved in, the life and work of the Tar River Baptist Association.

Yes, we are family. We, the members of the churches of the Tar River Baptist Association, are part of the wonderful family of God. In his letter to the Ephesian Church, Paul summed it up well with these words: "So then, you are not foreigners or strangers any longer; you are now fellow citizens with God's people and members of the family of God. You, too, are built upon the foundation laid by the apostles and prophets, the cornerstone being Christ Jesus Himself. He is the one who holds the whole building together and makes it grow into a sacred temple dedicated to the Lord. In union with Him you are being built together with all the others into a place where God lives through His Spirit" (Eph. 2:19-22).

ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The Associational Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the Annual Meeting in October 1995.

November 27, 1995

Moderator for the session was Gary McNair. Forty people were present, representing

WMU Council Director Lottie Lou Dickens announced that on December 2, Christmas boxes will be taken to the Fountain Correctional Center for Women in Rocky Mount. While there, the women will enjoy a program and refreshments. This event is co-hosted by the WMUs of Tar River and North Roanoke Associations. A video is being made of WMU activities and projects within the Association. The first activity on the video is the Centerville Baptist Church preparing Christmas boxes for children in Bosnia. An Associational WMU Day of Prayer was held on November 5, with fifty-two people in attendance. At the meeting an offering of \$143.75 was collected for the International WMU.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton reported that the State Baptist Men provided help with construction at the Sims Baptist Church. Baptist Men's Day is scheduled for January 28, 1996. He urged each church to do something special for the men that will encourage them to get involved with missions.

Sunday School Council Director Shelby Stephens reported that the ASSISTeam will be attending state training in February 1996.

Discipleship Training Supporter Jody Griffin reported an excellent turnout at the "Calling All Christians" event which was held in October. Two strategy meetings are on the calendar for 1996: one in January and one in May. Bible Drills and a Bible Drill Kick Off are being planned for 1996.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren reported that the Association assisted with the music at the WMU Day of Prayer, several revivals, and a few from the association participated in the choir at the seminary. She announced that Christmas Caroling was scheduled for December 21. Plans are being made for a choir, consisting of music directors and pastors, to sing at the Associational Spring Meeting.

Mrs. Georgette Guin presented the financial report.

Rev. Bill Wallace reported that the brick work on the new associational center is almost complete. The cost for this work is \$20,000.

Family Ministry Council Director Paul Douglas reported that the council will be meeting to coordinate events for 1996. They want to plan seminars on issues like divorce, parent/child relationships, and marital relationships. He emphasized that churches should be ministering to families.

Director of Missions Bill Wallace reported that the heating and air conditioning work in the new associational center needed to be done before any other inside work could be started. He urged individuals and churches to send contributions so that the new center could be completed without having to stop the work. He announced that workers, toys, and donations were still needed for the toy store ministry. He reported that only three churches were without pastors: Philadelphia, Harris Chapel, and Rocky Cross. He concluded his report by announcing the Ministers' and Mates' Christmas Banquet to be held on December 2, 1995.

Rev. Ed Carroll reported that several pastors would be meeting at the Winn Dixie parking lot on November 28, to go to Campbell University for the Winter Bible Study Preparation. He extended an invitation to anyone interested in going.

March 25, 1996

Moderator for the session was Gary McNair. Fifty-five people were present, representing twenty-three churches.

Family Ministry Council Director Paul Douglas encouraged churches to invite the Family Ministry Council to speak on family issues in Sunday School classes or worship services. He has statistical information and materials on family issues available for loan to the churches.

WMU Council Director Lottie Lou Dickens announced the Annual Associational WMU Spring Meeting to be held at Louisburg Baptist Church on Monday, April 1. She reported that four members of the Leadership Team will be attending the State WMU Annual Meeting at Ridgecrest March 29-31. She announced that on the WMU Achievement Guide for 1994-95, three WMU organizations received the honor of being distinguished (Ephesus-13 years, Social Plains-14 years, and Flat Rock-1 year) and the WMU of Philadelphia received the honor of being standard. Mrs. Dickens has served as Associational WMU Director for three years. Ms. Kathy Braswell of the Philadelphia Baptist Church will be assuming this position. Mrs. Dickens will move to the position of Assistant WMU Director.

Reporting for Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton, Rev. Bill Wallace made the following announcements: a Tar River Benefit Superball Golf Tournament will be held on April 18; the NC Baptist Men's bus will be at the Associational Semi-Annual Meeting with a representative speaking during the afternoon session; and the State Baptist Men's Convention has been rescheduled for May 17-18.

Rev. Wallace also presented the report for Music Council Director Nanette Warren. A choir consisting of Pastors and Ministers of Music will be singing at the Associational Semi-Annual Meeting. The Music School, originally scheduled for April, has been rescheduled for July 15.

Mrs. Georgette Guin, reporting for Sunday School Council Director Shelby Stephens, announced the upcoming Vacation Bible School Clinics. The VBS Early Bird Clinic, for Pastors and VBS Directors, will be on April 11. The clinics for all VBS workers will be on May 9 and 14.

Discipleship Training Supporter Stephen Brock-Loftis announced the Associational Bible Drill to be held on April 1, at the First Baptist Church of Spring Hope. He said that eight people are currently involved in the study "Witnessing Thru Relationships." A Bible Drill Kick Off is scheduled for September 1996 to help drillers and leaders prepare for 1997 Bible Drills.

Rev. Bill Wallace, reporting for Evangelism Council Director DuPre Sanders, announced that the group "Witness" will be sharing at Franklinton sometime in late summer. Mrs. Nan Jones added that the date set for this event is August 9.

Treasurer Pete Colbert presented the monthly financial report for February, and the annual report for 1995.

Rev. Luis Maravi, Pastor for the Strickland's Crossroads Hispanic Mission, reported that average attendance at the mission is fifty, with a recent high attendance of seventy-two. He informed the Board that twenty-five youth attended a youth banquet on February 10. The youth participated in the Associational Basketball league for the first time. On February 25, one youth and one adult was baptized. Four ladies will attend the State WMU Meeting at Ridgecrest. Services at the mission are now being held on Sunday mornings. Needs of the Hispanic ministry are: clothes (especially long sleeved shirts for short, small men), health kits, and chairs.

Rev. Wallace announced that the team from Strickland's Crossroads received the "Best Christian Attitude Award" given at the end of the Basketball Season.

Vice Moderator Adolphus Batchelor presented the following two recommendations from the Associational Council:

- (1) We recommend a target date of October 1, 1996, or earlier if possible, for the new building to be completed and ready for occupancy.
- (2) We further recommend that every church be encouraged to have a special project of some kind with proceeds going to the associational building fund.

He made motions that each of these recommendations be adopted. The vote for both motions carried.

Rev. Wallace announced the Men's and Women's Softball Leagues will begin play the first of May. The official signed rosters should be sent to the associational office by April 8.

Rev. Wallace then gave his Director of Missions report. The Associational Semi-Annual Meeting scheduled for April 29, will held at the Red Bud Baptist Church. Work on the new building continues with the installation of the dry wall. A little more brick work is needed, and the outside heating and air conditioning units need to be installed. About \$3,000.00 is needed to complete the work that is now underway. Churches are encouraged to help finish what has been started.

Rev. Wallace, Rev. Gary McNair, and Mr. Terry Alford have just returned from South Africa. While there they met with pastors and church leaders to listen to needs and requests. A detailed report will be given soon. Those interested in being a part of a mission team to South Africa should contact the Associational Office.

TAR RIVER LISTENING TEAM REPORT October 30-November 2, 1995

BACKGROUND

In 1994, the staff of the Baptist State convention began a "listening process" designed to allow convention personnel to hear the concerns of pastors and laity in order to be more responsive to the needs of North Carolina churches. This process is predicated on the assumption that the Baptist State Convention is to assist all churches in their divinely inspired mission; thus, in order to assist the churches, it is important to know what the needs and concerns in the churches are.

Listening teams are formed to go into an association when a particular association makes a request for such a team. At the request of Bill Wallace, Director of Missions, a team was assembled to go into the Tar River Association, October 30-November 2, 1995.

TEAM MEMBERS AND LISTENING PROCESS

The Listening Team for the Tar River Association was comprised of six Baptist State Convention employees: Bill Boatwright, Communications; Richard Brunson, Baptist Men; Janice Haywood, Sunday School; Carolyn Hopkins, WMU; Kay Huggins, Youth and Campus Ministries; and Wendy Edwards, Regional Missionary and Laity Leadership.

These six people met with Bill Wallace in preparation for the listening time. He helped the team understand the "culture" of the association. Together they developed plans for how this time might best be spent.

Through the associational office contacts were made with pastors in the association asking them to participate in the listening process. As a result of these contacts, twenty-eight interviews were scheduled. In addition, four listening sessions were scheduled for laity within the association. These sessions were scheduled for four different locations on Wednesday evening of that week.

As a "kick-off" for the listening process, Bill Wallace and Roy Smith, Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist State Convention, hosted a meal for church staff members and their spouses. There were forty-two persons in attendance at the Monday evening gathering. Smith explained the listening concept, how this would enable the convention personnel to be more responsive, and how he hoped this would assist the churches in their ministries.

On Thursday of the "listening week," the team met with the Associational Council to share a summary of what had been heard during the listening sessions.

WHAT WE HEARD

Overall, the listening process was quite positive. Concerns about various issues were raised, but there was no predominate negative theme. In fact, there was an overwhelming expression of appreciation for what was being done within the association as well as the convention. Perhaps the major concern that was raised focused on how to get people to respond to what was already planned and being done.

Another concern that surfaced related to the presence and influence of Southeastern Seminary. There were persons who felt that Southeaster students and faculty were not being utilized enough, while others felt that the seminary was having a negative impact on the association. (Parenthetically, there were several comments made concerning the "attack" on Southeastern by the "Biblical Recorder".) Currently, six churches are being pastored by Southeastern students. Four of these talked with members of the listening team. Four churches are being pastored by Duke Divinity students. One of these talked with a listening team member.

While there was no one theme that dominated the conversations, there are several issues or concerns that deserve noting:

- 1. There is a need for a better delivery system. Good programs are being planned (both by association leaders and by convention personnel). How can we improve attendance?
- 2. There is a need to have individuals available to work with churches and interpret Baptist programs to the local church.
- 3. There is a need to develop a stronger prayer emphasis. This could focus on developing a personal prayer life as well as strengthening the prayer for work within the association and convention. (It is worth noting that the Associational Council agreed to pray for the concerns which were raised with the listening team.)

- 4. There is a need for assistance in dealing with such current social issues as AIDS, homelessness, racism, etc. In this respect, there was an expressed need for staff assistance in the Christian social ministry (CSM) area.
- 5. There is a need to develop a referral network for counseling issues. This could include developing a list of local pastors who might have some expertise in a specific area of counseling as well as developing a list of professional counselors that might be used for referrals. (The association will work with Baptist Hospital to see if a counselor could come in for one or two days each month to provide counseling for those who need this service. Space will be provided in the new associational building.)
- 6. There is a need for quality leadership workshops and conferences in the area of evangelism, deacon training, laity leadership and youth leadership. These areas were specifically mentioned. Here it should be noted that the Associational Council acknowledged that such workshops/conference have been planned, but attendance has been poor.
- 7. There is a need to assist churches in the pastor search process, to help churches assess pastor church relationships and to focus on helping pastors and churches get off to a good start. (This is already in place. All a church has to do to secure this kind of assistance is to contact the Director of Missions.)
- 8. There is a need to help pastors focus on their spiritual development rather than soley on management styles of leadership. (Help in this area is already being offered through the monthly meeting of the Ministers' Conference and through "Life Series" studies offered by the Associational Discipleship Support Team.)
- 9. There is a need for continuing educational opportunities for ministers. These opportunities should be high quality and should be designed to help keep pastors on the "cutting edge" of their ministries.
- 10. There is a need in the area of assistance and encouragement for ministers' wives. Suggestions ranged from practical helps to opportunities for personal nurture and development.
- 11. There is a need to provide orientation and instruction for new ministers. Here it should be noted that New Ministers Orientation is offered twice a year at the Baptist State Convention; attention should be given to making the new pastors aware of this opportunity. (New Minister Orientation is already being offered in the association. Sometimes it is done with groups. At other times it is offered on an individual basis.)
- 12. There is a need to have new resources (audio-visuals, publications, etc.) available for pastors and other church leaders.
- 13. There is a need to consider new church starts within the association, especially along the US 64 corridor.
- 14. There was a request to put the camp dates (Mundo Vista, Caraway, Caswell) in the associational newsletter. (These dates are in the current associational calendar and also in the March and May newsletters.)
- 15. There is a need for the training and development of music leadership among the laity. Most of the churches utilize laity or volunteers to lead the music program and it was felt that some basic music education would be beneficial. Too, there was an expressed need for church pianists and organists. It may be that a piano/organ teacher is needed in the area. Others felt that substitute pianists and organists might be available if there were some system developed to let churches know about these persons.
- 16. There was one specific request for assistance in the area of church building and planning.
- 17. There is a need to develop a sense of trust among those in the association. Some fear a split in the association and state convention; others express that there is not the support for association programs or the support of individuals. Developing a sense of trust might enhance this support.

 IMPLICATIONS

What does all of this mean? How can this information be used to enhance the work of the Tar River Baptist Association and the churches in this association?

1. One issue which must not be ignored is that which is raised in item number 17 and underlies the "Southeastern issue" as outlined above. Trust is essential if people

are to work together. Trust comes through sharing common experiences and developing mutual respect. It is not necessary to agree with someone in order to trust them.

Perhaps the convention can cooperate with the association to conduct a series of "conflict management" seminars or seminars on "establishing mutual respect" or "respecting our differences." While such seminars would not be limited to differences over Southeastern, the "Southeastern issue" could certainly be addressed by this means. (The program for the April meeting of the Ministers' Conference was on "Conflict Resolution in the Local Church." A representative from the Baptist State Convention was the program leader.)

The differences that emerged through the listening process were not all theological. Some of the differences that could be addressed are cultural. In listening to people from churches throughout the association, it was apparent that some of the pastors who come into the area may not be totally familiar with Eastern North Carolina culture. This is not intended to be a judgmental statement, but a statement of fact. Many students at both Duke and Southeastern come from outside North Carolina. An attempt to help new pastors understand the "church culture" of Eastern North Carolina could serve to enhance the ministries of these individuals. (Some of this is already being done in New Pastor Orientation.)

2. The need for an improved delivery system for "Baptist information" has surfaced in almost all of the listening sessions across the state. Thus, several options are under consideration by convention staff persons.

Some type of "Baptist Catalogue" might be developed that would give some annotated description of what Baptists have to offer. Each association could personalize this with a listing of local agencies and referral services.

Convention personnel continue to discuss how we might be more available to churches and associations to interpret the various Baptist programs and to be resources to local Baptist entities. Certainly, anyone in the association should feel free to call on any of the staff who were on the listening team for concerns they might have.

Essentially, convention staff members feel that adequate, quality training events already exist both at the state and associational levels. Efforts must be made to improve communication regarding the resources that are available.

- 3. The Associational Council might consider ways to develop an information network that could be made readily available to pastors and other church leaders. Such a network could include referrals for counseling, a list of agencies and/or individuals to assist with social concerns, and a list of persons who could serve as substitute pianists and organists.
- 4. As the association prepares to move its offices into the new building, the Associational Council should consider ways to utilize the new facility as a resource center in every sense of the word.
- 5. Through the Associational Council, the Ministers' Conference or some other means, the associational pastor leadership might assess areas to be emphasized in continuing education events. Then in cooperation with the Baptist State Convention, or some other entity, special continuing education emphases might be planned as annual events.
- 6. Other concerns that were raised will be referred to appropriate departments at the Baptist State Convention for further consideration and follow through. Such concerns include new church starts, CSM issues, and continuing education opportunities for pastors.

BYLAWS

Tar River Baptist Association, Inc.

PREAMBLE

For the declaration of its fundamental purposes and the permanent guidance and control of its activities, this body does adopt the following as its Bylaws, to wit:

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Corporation to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist

State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches; and to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Corporation.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. There shall be two (2) classes of membership in the Corporation: voting and non-voting. The non-voting membership shall be composed of all of the members of the churches affiliated with the Corporation. Voting members of the Corporation shall be known as messengers and shall be elected annually by each of the individual churches affiliated with the Corporation in accordance with the following schedule: Each church is entitled to four (4) messengers. Any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred (200) is entitled to two (2) additional messengers per one hundred (100) members (or major fraction thereof) in excess of two (200) hundred. No church shall be entitled to more than ten (10) messengers.

SECTION 2. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Corporation shall constitute a guorum at meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The Corporation shall meet bi-annually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session.

ARTICLE IV - RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE CORPORATION

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Corporation by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator and the Director of Missions shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES OF THE CORPORATION

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Corporation by filing the Annual Church Profile; to send messengers to the bi-annual meetings of the Corporation; to give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Corporation. The Corporation secretary (known as the Clerk) shall furnish the churches with the necessary printed forms and/or software for their Annual Church Profiles. These materials are to be distributed to the churches at least six (6) weeks before the Annual Fall session of the Corporation. The churches are requested to have the Church Profiles in the hands of the Clerk not less than two weeks before the fall meeting of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE CORPORATION

SECTION 1. The Corporation shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

SECTION 2. The Corporation may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that treats with contempt the purposes and requirements of the Corporation, or that applies for its own dismissal. The Corporation may also dissolve connection with any church that does not file a Church Profile or have messengers attending its Annual Fall Meetings for two (2) consecutive years.

ARTICLE VII - OFFICERS

The officers of the Corporation shall be: Director of Missions, Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Trustees.

ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to lead the Corporation to fulfill its mission faithfully, effectively, and lovingly. His role is three-dimensional: (1) mission strategist, (2) minister to the churches, pastors, and other church staff members, and (3) general leader of the Corporation. Within the limits of his time and ability, he is to respond to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Corporation.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Clerk (also known as the Secretary) to provide administrative support services to the Director of Missions and to the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. It shall also be the duty of the Clerk to record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the bi-annual meetings and of the Executive Board, and to make this information available on request. The Clerk shall use all diligence to have the record of transactions printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible; and to distribute to the church clerks reminders about, and forms for, the Annual Church Profile. The Clerk shall also serve as ex-officio Secretary of the Executive Board.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to plan for and preside over the bi-annual and called meetings of the Corporation and the quarterly Executive Board meetings, and to encourage fellowship and mutual care among the churches. He shall open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. The Moderator shall appoint a Parliamentarian to serve at each meeting of the Corporation and the Executive Board Meetings. He shall also serve as ex-officio chairman of the Executive Board. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two (2) one-year terms in succession.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to assist in developing fellowship and mutual care among the churches and church leaders. He shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in the Moderator's absence, serve as vice-chairman of the Executive Board, and serve as Chairman of the Executive Council.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to assist in receiving, accounting, and disbursing of all the Corporation's monies as authorized by the Corporation or the Executive Board. By virtue of his office the Treasurer shall be an ex officio member of the Finance Committee.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to act as the legal agents of the Corporation and shall hold title of all property of the Corporation. In the name of the Corporation they shall be authorized and empowered to receive title to real and personal property, and to sell and convey or mortgage same upon authority duly given by the Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. They are also responsible for keeping an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Corporation, a copy of which is to be kept on file in the Corporation's Office. The Trustees are to be three (3) in number, and they are to serve for a term of three (3) years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

The Committees of the Corporation are administrative in nature. These administrative Committees are as follows: Nominating; Credentials; Finance; Resolutions; Time, Place, and Preacher; Program; By-Laws; Christian Education; Strategy; Properties; History; and others deemed necessary or desirable. Each Committee shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. Committee members shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin immediately upon the adjournment of the Annual Fall Meeting of the Corporation. Members are allowed to serve more than one term in succession.

ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to nominate all officers, leaders, committeemen, and council representatives with the exception of the Director of Missions, the Clerk, and any other paid employees. This committee is to be appointed by the Moderator, and shall retain at least two (2) of its members from the preceding year.

SECTION 2. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in determining when churches are of like faith and order, and when they can be properly accepted in the fellowship of the Corporation. It is also the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Corporation as voting members of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in securing, administering, and reporting its finances. This committee will plan and propose an annual budget to the Executive Board and suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. This committee

shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. At least two (2) of its members shall be retained from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as an ex-officio member of this committee.

SECTION 4. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in studying resolutions for adoption by the Corporation or the Executive Board. This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Corporation's feelings in regard to the bi-annual meetings, officers of the Corporation, host churches, and other matters.

SECTION 5. The TIME, PLACE, and PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place, and preacher for the bi-annual meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Corporation and the host pastors of the bi-annual meetings. It shall be their duty to assist the Corporation in planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Corporation. They shall receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form for the bi-annual meetings which, upon the adoption by the Corporation, shall become its order of business.

SECTION 7. The BYLAWS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to make recommendations relative to Bylaw changes. This Committee shall receive all proposed changes and/or amendments to the Bylaws of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc., and upon study of said changes and/or amendments make recommendations to the Corporation concerning said changes and/or amendments.

SECTION 8. The CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to keep before the churches of the Corporation all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

SECTION 9. The STRATEGY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in determining strategic objectives and staying on course in achieving them.

SECTION 10. The PROPERTIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in properties administration. This Committee shall develop and recommend policies and procedures for using the Corporation's facilities and equipment.

SECTION 11. The HISTORY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Corporation's life and work.

ARTICLE XI - INSTITUTIONAL AND AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES

The Denomination's Institutional and Agency Representatives shall include the following: Annuity Board, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes, Christian Higher Education, Religious Literature, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Mission. The representatives for these institutions and agencies shall be responsible for providing information to the churches during the year, and/or giving reports on the work of the institutions and agencies at the bi-annual meetings of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XII - MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

The Mission Performance Councils undergird and give support to the work of program related ministries of the Corporation. Training leadership shall be a primary responsibility of these Councils. All Mission Performance Councils shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. These Mission Performance Councils are as follows: Seminary Extension, Ordination Advisory, Music, Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Vacation Bible School, Recreation, Media Library, Pastoral Ministries, Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions Development, Youth Ministry, and Family Ministry.

ARTICLE XIII - DUTIES OF THE MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

SECTION 1. The SEMINARY EXTENSION COUNCIL shall direct any Seminary Extension Program for the churches affiliated with the Corporation. This Council shall be composed of at least (5) members.

SECTION 2. The ORDINATION ADVISORY COUNCIL shall be composed of at least (5) members.

It shall be the responsibility of this Council to act only in an advisory capacity for churches seeking assistance in examining prospective candidates approved for ordination. This Council shall conduct its work within the guidelines of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The MUSIC COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. This Council shall plan and implement the music program of the Corporation. They shall recommend to the Program Committee the music for the bi-annual meetings, and they shall enlist accompanists for all Corporation Meetings.

SECTION 4. The SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of the ASSISTeam to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate Sunday School Work.

SECTION 5. The DISCIPLESHIP SUPPORT TEAM shall be composed of at least two (2) members and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of this team to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the total Discipleship Ministry of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION shall consist of the leadership recommended by the WMU Nominating Committee and elected by the Corporation's WMU. This Council will have the responsibility of planning, promoting, conducting, and evaluating WMU work.

SECTION 7. The BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL shall be composed of the officers of the Corporation's Brotherhood. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the work of Baptist Men and also the work of Royal Ambassadors.

SECTION 8. The VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. The Vacation Bible School Council Director is the leader of the VBS Team and shall plan and promote the Corporation's VBS Clinics. The age-group VBS leaders who comprise this team shall be responsible for conducting the VBS Clinics.

SECTION 9. The RECREATION COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members whose duty it shall be to help plan, coordinate, promote, and conduct the entire recreation program of the Corporation. They shall be available to assist any entity of the Corporation with the planning and conducting of recreational activities. The work of this Council includes setting up and supervising the Basketball Program, and any other Sports Program that may be started. This Council will also plan, promote, and conduct the Annual Royal Ambassador Track Meet, and the Annual Royal Ambassador Car Competition.

SECTION 10. The MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL shall consist of at least three (3) members. This Church Media Library Organization is often referred to as TACMO. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to provide for the mutual sharing of inspiration and information for furthering the Church Media Center Ministry of the affiliated churches.

SECTION 11. The PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL shall be composed of the following: (1) Pastoral Ministries Director, (2) Church Administration Services Coordinator, (3) Deacon Ministry Coordinator, (4) Vocational Guidance Coordinator, and (5) Church Weekday Education Coordinator, and any others that may be deemed necessary or advisable. The duties of this Council shall be to determine the pastoral ministries emphasis needed or desired and to schedule the events in cooperation with the total programming of the Corporation. The major task of the Council shall be the development and training of ministers through conferences, workshops, clinics, awareness meetings, retreats, and ministry support groups.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. It shall be the duty of this Council to plan and promote any evangelism programs, training projects, and rallies needed or desired. It shall also be the responsibility of this Council to keep evangelism before the pastors and laypeople of the Corporation.

SECTION 13. The STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for stewardship development and promotion within or among the churches of the Corporation. It will be the task of this Council to seek to lead the churches to set specific, attainable, measurable stewardship goals.

SECTION 14. The MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall consist of at least seven (7) members. This Council shall be responsible for missions development in the total program of the Corporation. The Council shall not only be concerned with already established missions, mission work, and mission activities; it shall be concerned with beginning new

mission work. It will be their responsibility to study the missionary needs of the Corporation and make recommendations concerning new work. They shall also recommend missions projects or activities with which the churches in the Corporation may cooperate. They shall strive to get each church in the Corporation to elect or appoint a Church Mission Development Council.

SECTION 15 The YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least (5) members, shall be responsible for planning youth related ministries for the Corporation including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

SECTION 16. The FAMILY MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for helping to plan, promote, and conduct any program emphasis related to family life. This Council should strive to include the needs of senior adults, single adults, marriage partners, parents, and children.

ARTICLE XIV - THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Executive Council shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, the Directors of the various Program Councils, and three members at large. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to assist the Director of Missions in planning, coordinating, promoting, and executing the Corporation's Programs, making recommendations to the Executive Board or to the Corporation in its Annual Fall Meeting. It shall also be the duty of this Council to plan the annual calendar. This Council shall meet quarterly on another Monday evening prior to each Executive Board meeting, and at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or Moderator.

ARTICLE XV - THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Corporation Officers and key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Pastor, Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Board Members shall be members of the church they represent. If a church does not have one or more of these leaders, it may appoint a substitute for each vacancy and shall submit the name/names with the church profile.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall meet quarterly usually during March, June, September, and November on Monday night following the fourth Sunday of the month unless a conflict necessitates moving the meeting to Monday after the third or fifth Sunday. The Executive Board may meet at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator for the purpose of transacting special or urgent business.

SECTION 3. Although each church should earnestly strive to get its full contingent of key leaders to attend, there is no quorum requirement for transacting business at a regular or called meeting of the Executive Board.

SECTION 4. The Director of Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive Board and does not have the power to vote.

SECTION 5. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as follows:

- a. The Executive Board is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary, and to define his duties.
 - b. To act for the Corporation between regular sessions of the body.
 - c. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.
- d. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
- e. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Corporation the annual budget, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered by the Corporation.
- f. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Board in the name of the Corporation shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XVI - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Corporation, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XVII - AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of the Corporation's meeting. The said amendment(s) must be presented to the afternoon session and voted on no earlier than the evening session.

ARTICLE XVIII - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES

The business of the Corporation shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE XIX - BUSINESS PROCEDURE

- 1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.
- 2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.
- 3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Corporation or an invited guest.

avoid discourteous personal remarks.

- Moderator as a member of the Corporation or an invited guest.

 4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and
- 5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator, and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.
 - 6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.
- 7. Any resolution to be presented to the Executive Board and/or bi-annual meetings must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Corporation and published in the Corporation's newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.
- 8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.
- 9. Each Fall Session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the annual sermon.
- 10. Reports of committees must be brief not exceeding five hundred words. Other reports should not exceed three hundred words each.
 - 11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.
- 12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Librarian of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina; Biblical Recorder, Raleigh, North Carolina; Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina; Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee; and State Baptist Convention.
- 13. The host churches of the bi-annual meetings shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words). These histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Corporation.

- 1. Moderator Gary McNair called the meeting to order.
- 2. Mrs. Annette Aldridge, Ransdell Chapel, led in singing the hymn, "Let Your Heart Be Broken.".
- 3. Rev. William Bussey, Stanhope Baptist Church, read scripture, and led in prayer.
- 4. Rev. Shelby Stephens, Pilot Baptist Church, presented the Sunday School Council report.
- 5. Rev. Jody Griffin, Spring Hope First, presented the Discipleship report with the help of the Discipleship Support Team and guests. The team distributed booklets with discipleship ideas.
- 6. Ms. Kathy Braswell, Philadelphia Baptist Church, presented the WMU report. Eight members of the WMU Leadership Team met on October 13. The team is looking into coed missions and will be emphasizing child advocacy this year. The Tar River WMU will be joining the North Roanoke WMU to fix boxes for the Women's Correctional Center in Rocky Mount. The WMU of each church in the Tar River Association is encouraged to contribute \$80 to help fill the boxes with items needed. The boxes will be packed on November 23, and delivered on December 5. Mrs. Elaine Lewis, Pilot Baptist Church, will lead a study of the book The Great Commission: A Study of the WMU Tasks on October 29, at Pilot Baptist Church. The WMU Leadership Team members will sponsor a booth at the Craft Bazaar in Louisburg on November 1 &2 with proceeds going to help team members go to South Africa. The Associational Baptist Women's Day of Prayer will be held on November 3, at Pine Ridge Baptist Church. Fifty-three women, representing sixteen churches, attended the WMU Fall Workshop at Union Chapel on September 30. Two new Women on Mission groups have been started. Mrs. Elaine Lewis, Pilot; Miss Nanette Warren, Pilot; Mrs. Orfelinda Maravi, Victoria En Cristo; and Ms. Kathy Braswell, Philadelphia received training in October and are now a part of the NC State WMU Resource Team.
- 7. Mr. Wayne Gupton, Red Bud Baptist Church, presented the report for the Brotherhood Council.
- 8. Rev. David Averette, Franklinton Baptist Church, presented the Evangelism Council report.
- 9. Special music was presented by Mrs. Brenda Jones, Philadelphia Baptist Church.
- 10. Rev. Wallace presented his Director of Missions' report. In comparing the 1996 Digest of Letters with last year, most churches reported increases in most areas. He explained how the toy ministry, a vehicle to reach people with the gospel, works. He encouraged churches to collect toys, and people to volunteer. He gave an update on the new building and explained that the new resource center was desperately needed. He said that labor and money was still needed to finalize the building, but together we could do it. He reported that a construction team of eight people was needed in February to go to South Africa. He said that if a person could not physically go to South Africa, then maybe they could financially help someone else to go. He concluded his report by announcing that clean up after Hurricane Fran was still being done. Anyone wanting to help or needing help should call the Associational office.
- 11. Special music was presented by the Samaria Baptist Church Choir.
- 12. Dr. Fred McGehee brought the evening message.
- 13. Mrs. Aldridge led in singing the hymn, "We Are Called To Be God's People."
- 14. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reporting for the Credentials Committee, said that attendance at the Fall Annual Meeting for 1996 was as follows: 91 messengers, 8 alternates, 27 pastors, 11 associational officers, 26 guests (for a total of 163 people) representing 37 churches and 1 mission.

15. The Resolutions Committee Report was given by Rev. Jody Griffin, Spring Hope, First Baptist Church, as follows:

Whereas, Samaria Baptist Church has graciously provided her facilities for the use of the 1996 Fall Annual Meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association, and

Whereas, Holly Grove, Poplar Spring and Stanhope Baptist Churches have offered assistance to Samaria Baptist Church in the service of this meeting;

Be it therefore resolved, that we express our sincere appreciation to all who have worked to insure our comfort and to provide a delicious meal during this annual session.

Rev. Griffin made a motion that these resolutions be adopted. The vote carried.

16. After closing comments by Moderator Gary McNair, the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Grady Dickens, Poplar Spring Baptist Church.

HISTORY OF SAMARIA BAPTIST CHURCH

The Samaria Baptist Church is located in the small rural community of Samaria, Nash County, North Carolina, near the towns of Spring Hope and Middlesex. The church began in 1823 with a small group of men and women from the mother church, believed to be a Primitive Baptist Church near Middlesex, NC. These early Christians built a white frame church at the intersection of Hwys. 97 and 231. A second frame building was built later, and in 1940 the present brick building was built under the leadership of Rev. A. D. Parrish.

Samaria has remained a "mission-minded" church, supporting missions since its beginning. The early revivals were held during the day time, usually in July/August, with services lasting all day. Bringing their lunch, families shared a time of fellowship as well as the spiritual messages often brought by a visiting minister. As landowners brought their servants and "colored" workers to the revivals, many of them accepted Christ and became members of the church.

Church life was to be taken seriously and many members (male/female) were excommunicated. Reasons for loss of fellowship/membership included: card playing, profanity, dancing, drunkenness, adultery, fornication, failing to pay dues, falsehood, non-attendance, broken fellowship, making/selling intoxicating drink. Members were disciplined when they failed to meet Christian standards for conduct. Erring members were contacted and efforts were made to restore them to proper conduct, to forgive them and to allow full fellowship.

Prayer, on behalf of the church and individuals, was an integral part of the Christian responsibility. The church set apart the "fourth Sunday in November" and the "first Sunday in March" as days of fasting, prayer, and thanksgiving to Almighty God for temporal/spiritual blessings. The members were generally quite poor, and offerings were small, but given from sincere Christians. The pastor's salary often included food gifts along with whatever monetary gift available. In 1884, the pastor's salary was \$60.00, which was collected from the membership by a chosen committee. The early pastors were warmly loved and respected among the fellowship and did not experience extreme hardships because of the small salary.

Early church buildings were used for religious services and as a "public school". In March 1866, motion was made/seconded that the neighborhood be allowed to teach school in the church house for five months "on condition they take good care of it." This included bringing wood for the stove and keeping the floors swept.

Samaria Church has belonged to the Roanoke and Raleigh Association, and presently is a member of the Tar River Association. It hosted the associational meetings as early as October 4, 1887 and has continued to do so ofter. These meetings have always been well attended by messengers chosen/elected by the individual churches. Along with inspirational preaching and progress reports of the churches, a meal was enjoyed at "fellowship time".

Leadership positions were taken seriously as the church carefully but firmly delegated responsibility. Men held the positions until late 1930's. Strong spirit-filled revivals brought increased membership. On August 23, 1881, the door of the church opened to receive "by experience" twenty-five males and thirty-three females. Until the 1900's, the church membership roll was separated by male, female, and colored. It seemed to be important for the male membership to be present, especially during church conference meetings. The roll was called for the males at each meeting and at intervals for the females. In 1881 the

membership consisted of 109 females, 52 males, and 2 colored. In 1930 Sunday School enrollment was 123. In 1957 Sunday School increased to 252, with an average attendance of 187. The first Vacation Bible School was held in 1951 with 161 enrolled. The second VBS, in 1952, had 198 in attendance. Sunday School enrollment was 193. Our church has been honored to see the following new churches begun in other communities from its' membership: Rocky Cross, Union Hope, Social Plains, Stanhope, and a church at Gold Valley, which was destroyed by fire, and the membership later uniting with the Gold Valley Methodist Church.

Samaria Church has been blessed with dedicated and compassionate pastors. Rev. Colon S. Jackson, Jr. was Samaria's first full-time pastor. In 1922 Rev. R. W. Nobles baptized

seventy-five converts (at one service) in the John Murray mill-pond.

Several renovations have allowed added classrooms, a library, improved heating/air-conditioning and a Christian Life Center used for fellowship and recreation. A home is located on the church grounds for the pastor/family. Many memorials have made possible new choir robes, hymnals, handbells, chimes, and a lovely church steeple.

God has blessed in a marvelous way, leading faithful and dedicated Christians to minister/witness in Samaria and to the uttermost parts through Associational, State, Home, and Foreign Missions. He has commanded us (by example) to show Christ to the world.

The 173 year history of Samaria Church is a reflection of God's continuing grace and love given to us, His children. As we put our hands in His and walk with Him, we will find others who will walk with us. May tomorrow hold a reflection built on the past commitment/dedication that we experience today. To God be Honor and Praise always.

HISTORY OF HOLLY GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

Holly Grove Baptist Church, named for the many holly trees that stood in the area, is located about three and one-half miles southwest of Spring Hope on Service Road 1315. It is about one and one-half miles west of Webb's Mill, just inside the Nash County line.

At the turn of the century, most churches held services in the community school house. As the community grew, Holly Grove began to talk about building their own church house. Some suggested sewing sacks together for a shelter; so in the early summer of 1914, several people met for that purpose.

As the weather permitted, Sunday School was held under the bush arbor and the Rev. Staley McGregor, our first pastor, preached there. In bad weather the group traveled to Cypress Chapel near Seven Paths or held services in the old Creekmore School house.

The first congregation of twenty-six members built a house of worship during the winter of 1915 and the spring of 1916. Mr. Jim B. Jeffreys gave the land, and the people gave the timber and labor to construct this first building. Immediately the Sunday School was formerly organized in the building with Herbert Sledge serving as Superintendent.

The first deacons to serve the church were Arthur Stallings, Herbert Sledge, and Newton Jeffreys.

During the fall revival 1916, thirty-five people accepted Christ. As the church grew, one could see that the Holy Spirit was at work and that the blessings were many. The church joined the Tar River Baptist Association that same year.

For awhile in the early 1960's, Holly Grove and Social Plains Baptist Church shared Rev. Keith Hart as pastor. Together they built a pastorium. Emit and Arthur Stallings donated the land. Through the years, the churches have remained friendly sharing revivals, social gatherings, and other events. Both have been richly blessed by the Lord.

One who did much to hold the church together during the early days was Mr. Millard Stallings. For years he built the fires in an old wooden heater, swept the floors, and did anything else that needed to be done. Even after his death in 1951, he has remained an example of one who put his faith into practice.

In the early 70's, a building program involving two phases was begun. The educational unit, built at a cost of \$20,000, was dedicated on February 1973 by Pastor Keith Hart. The new sanctuary, built for \$60,000, was dedicated on October 7, 1974 by Pastor Tommy Hayes. The final note burning on the total project took place in October 1978. The church has secured three additional acres of land from Raymond and Nancy Shearin.

Records reveal many interesting numerical ranges in various phases of our work: church membership ran from 111 to 199; Sunday School attendance ran from 31 to 129; annual expenses ran from \$116.75 to \$32,658; the pastor's salary has run from \$39.82 to \$18,200; and mission contributions have been from \$7.00 to \$2,162.

The Apostle Paul would probably commend the unity that prevails within the church family at the present. The church would not be what it is today without the blessings of God through His Son Jesus Christ, our Lord. The church has strived to present the gospel as it is written. It is dedicated to the service of the Lord.

HISTORY OF POPLAR SPRING BAPTIST CHURCH

While the thirteen colonies were struggling for independence, a small group of farmers met under a bush arbor near Norris Creek and established Poplar Spring Church. The following was recorded in a journal:

"We, the church of Christ whereof the Rev. William Lancaster is pastor, we the subscribers do join in a Gospel Church and give ourselves under the watchcare of the same to be admonished or reproved as need may require." June 7, A.D., 1788.

The first building was called the Poplar Spring Meeting House because of the cool water of Norris Creek and the poplar trees that surrounded the spring.

Services at the young church were conducted monthly, weather permitting, by a circuit riding pastor. Every first Saturday the congregation met in "conference" to take care of business which often proved to be matters of personal conduct of its members. As judge and jury, the congregation considered problems of "disorderly walking," "drinking and dancing," and "not supporting the gospel according to their abilities." The minutes reflect the seriousness of such conduct and the concern members had for erring members. Great effort was made to restore them to proper conduct, to forgive them, and to help them walk the "straight and narrow way." Race was not a factor in becoming a member of the church since it was customary for slaves of the members to affiliate. Land owners were admonished for not bringing slaves into the church. Records indicate that after 1865 fewer black members came.

Poplar Spring was aware of her mission to spread the Gospel and was willing to join other churches in the effort. In 1789 representatives from the church met with elders and deacons of Sandy Creek and Turkey Creek at the Turkey Creek Meeting House to plan these efforts. As early as October, 1789, the church joined in associational work by sending a delegate to Wilfield Meeting House in Pitt County. Later the church joined associational meetings in Bertie County, Wayne County, Person County, Halifax County, and others. In 1832 she became a member of Tar River Baptist Association where her allegiance has remained. By 1838 the church supported world wide missions by contributing \$25.35 to the North Carolina Convention for the Burma Mission.

Until the late 1800's Poplar Spring was the only church in this part of Franklin County. To provide more Bible study, church leaders organized Sunday Schools which met every Sunday in various communities. As soon as a Sunday School was strong enough, a church was organized. Hence, out of Poplar Spring the following churches were organized on the dates indicated: Cypress Chapel (1855), Rock Spring (1874), Bethlehem (1895), Pilot (1903), Bunn (1911). Pearce (1915), and Pine Ridge (1924). Giving its membership away to these churches, Poplar Spring became and still is one of the smaller churches in the association.

World War II brought many social/cultural changes. One of the benefits resulting from these changes and earlier lessons learned about tithing was the availability of more money. Through the years renovations to the sanctuary and additions of conveniences and necessities have made the building comfortable and adequate.

Until 1959 Poplar Spring was one of a field of churches served by one pastor who always lived in other communities. When Robert Deppe became the first full-time pastor, a parsonage was needed. The W.T. Williams family gave the land and plans for getting the money and materials were put into motion. Before the house was completed, the building fund was depleted. The trustees borrowed \$2500 which is the only indebtedness the church has ever had. Two years later the note was burned and the church was free of debt.

In June 1988, members, friends, and former pastors participated in a three day celebration of the bicentennial anniversary. The activities culminated on Sunday morning with a worship service conducted by Dr. Randall Lolley, a former pastor.

Through the years the church has been concerned with matters of doctrine and theology and the needs of the members. Although members have not always agreed on issues, they have solved problems without losing respect or love for each other. No record of any dissention exists.

For 208 years, the church has been becoming what it is today. Standing together are members and pastors with hands joined in the mystical fellowship of Christ and fellow man. Our challenge for the future is I Corinthians 2:9, But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love Him.

HISTORY OF STANHOPE BAPTIST CHURCH

In the southern part of Nash County in 1890, in the community of Stanhope, four land owners banded together to organize Stanhope Baptist Church. We are forever grateful to Thomas Westray, Garland Ricks, John J. Pitts, and Ed Dillard for drawing the community together to worship Jesus Christ. Land was given by Nathaniel Finch for a token of \$10.00.

From 1890 to 1900 the congregation met for worship services at the Stanhope Academy while members donated materials and labor to build the church building for only \$94.72.

The church has been active in the Tar River Association with the exception of a few years when we were in the Roanoke Association.

In 1953 the church was moved back approximately fifteen feet from the road and Sunday School rooms were built underneath the sanctuary. Formerly we had held Sunday School with the Methodist Church in the Stanhope School. It was a happy, rainy fourth Sunday in September when the rooms were dedicated to God and the study of His word.

Throughout the years the pastors serving the church have been many, and most of them were students from Wake Forest College and Southeastern Seminary. A pastorium was purchased in 1956 and served as a residence for our pastors until 1976 when it was sold. Our pastor at that time had a home in Spring Hope.

We participated in a student/pastor evaluation program through the Seminary.

The Woman's Missionary Society (WMU) has been a dynamic and contributing force in the history of Stanhope Baptist Church. It was organized in 1953 and became an outlet for the women of the church to make their contribution.

Church services are held on second and fourth Sundays with the traditional Communion Service at Thanksgiving and a Candlelight Christmas worship service.

In February of 1990 a new heating and air conditioning system was installed.

April 29, 1990 was a gloriously happy occasion as we celebrated "The One Hundredth Anniversary" with many former members and pastors returning to share in the celebration.

May 28, 1995 was another red letter day for Stanhope Baptist Church as we dedicated two bathrooms, a pastor's study, coat closet, utility room, and a vestibule, adding to the dignity of our building. A telephone was installed in the church in 1995.

As we look back on our heritage, we are aware that it is because of the dedication of those who have been faithful to God by ministering and sharing that our church has prospered.

EVANGELISM COUNCIL REPORT

The Evangelism Council worked in cooperation with the Discipleship leaders of the Tar River Association to provide the thirteen week study, Witnessing Through Your Relationships. We had eight churches represented in this study. The goals of this study was to help us be effective witnesses able to discern individuals' receptivity to Christ, to adapt our witnessing approach to meet a variety of needs, and to cultivate our relationships for sharing the good news of Jesus Christ. Our hope is that many of our Tar River churches would use this study in the LifeWay series as a training aid.

On August 9, the Evangelism Council worked with our associational youth workers to sponsor a "Witness" concert as an evangelistic outreach to the young people of the association. "Witness" is a group of college students with North Carolina ties who work

during the summer under the auspices of the Evangelism Department of our NC Baptist State Convention. The event was held at the Franklinton High School auditorium with approximatel two hundred people in attendance. Two people made first time decisions for Christ at this event.

On August 19, the study *People Sharing Jesus* was presented to the pastors of the Tar River Association during our Key Leadership Conference. This study is an exciting new evangelism tool that empowers people to communicate the gospel easily, naturally, and joyfully.

The Evangelism Council also took part in planning and promoting an area evangelism ral that was to have taken place on September 12, at Harris Chapel Baptist Church. This rally was a joint project between Tar River, Cullom, Flat River, and North Roanoke Associations along with the Evangelism Division of the Baptist State convention of NC. Unfortunately, this event was cancelled because of Hurricane Fran.

The Evangelism Council is available to help our Tar River churches in whatever way we can to better reach people for Christ. Jesus' message to us is clear, "the Son of Man must be lifted up, that everyone who believes in Him may have eternal life" (John 3:14b-15).

May people be led to wholeness and health, vitality and service, and may we wholeheartedly be about the Lord's business, the great business of disciplemaking.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT





Thank you for your good response to the NC Mission Offering. This offering is vital to Baptist Men's mission work in NC. At the time of this writing, final figures of the total amount received are not available.

REPORT OF VICTORY IN CHRIST HISPANIC MISSION

God has been great to the Victoria En Cristo Mission during 1995-96. Our average attendance during the winter months was fifty in Sunday School and fiftyfive in Worship Service. During the summer months we averaged sixty in Sunday School and seventy in worship.

The stability of some of our families has enabled us to be more than a simple mission. Activities have included fellowship, Bible study, improvements in worship music, the election of officers (Treasurer and Secretary), and the beginning of periodic business meetings.

Vicente Rangel from Mount Olive were our guest speakers. Two people were saved and seven made a reconciliation with the Lord. During the first week of July we had our Vacation Bible School with fifty children attending.

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the Semi-Annual Meeting in April 1996. Both meetings were held at Duke Memorial Baptist Church June 24, 1996

Moderator for the session was Rev. Gary McNair. Twenty-two people were present, representing twelve churches. Rev. Shelby Stephens was appointed as Parliamentarian.

WMU Leadership Team Director Ms. Kathy Braswell reported that members of the Associational WMU Leadership Team will attend Associational WMU Leadership training at Caraway on July 12 and 13. WMU projects for 95-96 include: Dare to Care: Aids, and health kits and refreshments for the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads. Ms. Braswell attended the State Key Leadership Conference at Caswell. She made a motion that the Tar River Baptist Association set a goal of \$15,000.00 minimum for the NC State Missions Offering and that each church be encouraged to promote and make a contribution to the offering in September. The motion was seconded by Mr. Richard Morgan, Franklinton Baptist Church, and the vote carried.

Rev. Wallace explained that the WMU and Brotherhood Divisions of the Baptist State Convention received their entire budget from the NC State Missions Offering. The Tar River Baptist Association also receives a percentage of the State Missions Offering.

Brotherhood Council Director Mr. Wayne Gupton announced the only training for Baptist Men and RA leaders in 1996 will be at the Associational Key Leadership Conference on August 19.

Sunday School Council Director Rev. Shelby Stephens encouraged churches to send Sunday School Leaders to the Associational Key Leadership Conference.

Rev. Wallace, reporting for the Discipleship Support Team, announced that one of the team members, Rev. Stephen Loftis, left the association to serve with Urban Ministries in Favetteville.

Rev. Wallace, reporting for Evangelism Council Director Rev. DuPre Sanders, announced the WITNESS Concert to be held on August 9.

Music Council Director Miss Nanette Warren reported that a choir, composed of about twenty Pastors and Music Directors from the association, provided some of the special music at the Associational Spring Semi-Annual Meeting. The association is also providing music at the Lake Royale Vacation Bible School June 24-28. She announced the Music School to be held on July 15, which will be led by a Music Mission Team from Georgia.

Mrs. Georgette Guin presented the financial report.

Mrs. Georgette Guin, reporting for Luis Maravi, Pastor at the Strickland's Crossroads Hispanic Mission, reported that average attendance at the mission for the spring quarter was fifty-five people. Attendance at the mission for the last two weeks was seventy. Over the past month Rev. Maravi has made visits and contacts with about 200 people, and has distributed approximately fifty health kits. Revival and a fifth year anniversary celebration will be held at the mission June 27-30. The services on Sunday, June 30 will be followed by a fellowship meal. Vacation Bible School will be held at the mission the first week in July, and will be staffed by members of the mission.

Vice Moderator Mr. Adolphus Batchelor gave the Associational Council Report with a recommendation that Rev. Carl Poole be added to the Discipleship Support Team. The vote carried.

Rev. McNair explained that according to law, when an association becomes incorporated, the body has to vote to transfer everything to the corporation and to dissolve the association. Then the corporation has to vote to accept the By-Laws and the members of the association, and to accept the transfer of the assets, liabilities, etc.

Mr. Batchelor presented the following motion:

I move that action be hereby authorized by the Trustees, Director of Missions, Clerk, Treasurer, and whomever else is necessary to take all the required steps to dissolve the association, Tar River Baptist Association, and offer and transfer all of its identity and assets, including all the real and personal property, and any other assets, liabilities, rights, and obligations, to the successor corporation of this Association.

I further move that the association, Tar River Baptist Association, be dissolved as soon as the authorized acts of the above transfer are completed.

The motion was seconded by Rev. Kenny Byrd, and the vote carried.

Upon a suggestion by Rev. Wallace, Rev. Gordon Joyner, Holly Grove Baptist Church, made a motion that Rev. Gary McNair be appointed temporary Moderator for the corporation and that Mrs. Georgette Guin be appointed temporary Clerk of the Corporation. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bill Moeller, Pleasant Grove Baptist Church, and the vote carried.

Rev. McNair recognized Mr. Batchelor who brought the following motion to the floor:

- I hereby move to accept all of the members of the former association, Tar River Baptist Association, as members of the corporation Tar River Baptist Association.
 - I further move to approve the Bylaws of Tar River Baptist Association, Incorporated.
- I further move to authorize the appropriate offices to open all necessary accounts on behalf of the corporation for financial stability.
- I further move that the following persons be the only persons to sign checks on behalf of the corporation:

Georgette Guin, Pete Colbert, Mary Conn

(Any two of the above named individuals may sign checks.)

I further move that the members of this corporation hereby authorize and instruct the directors to accept all the assets, liabilities, rights, and obligations, including real and personal property, as transfers and gifts to this Association corporation from its predecessor association, Tar River Baptist Association. The Directors are instructed and authorized to take all steps necessary to receive title in the name of the Association corporation to such assets. The corporation hereby further assumes responsibility for all the contracts, employment agreements and other legal obligations of Tar River Baptist Association.

I further move that the members of this corporation recognize, affirm and declare that this corporation is the sole successor of the association, Tar River Baptist Association, and that all rights of the former association are, so long as consistent with law, fully absorbed and merged into this corporation.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Richard Morgan, and the vote carried.

Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report reported that it is time to begin the trim work on the new associational building, but funds are not available to purchase the materials needed. He said that the new center only needed interior trim, lighting fixtures, overhead insulation, painting, floor coverings, and landscaping to be complete. It is anticipated that it will take about \$85,000.00 to complete the project.

Rev. Wallace also reported that volunteers were needed to participate in the South Africa Partnership. Currently requests have come for a Construction Team and a Repair Team to come in 1996. The cost is \$1850.00 per team member. Requests have also come for other things such as computers. He has secured three computers and churches are encouraged to provide these to South Africa at a cost of \$200 per computer. One computer was purchased by Mrs. Rachel Freeman, in honor of her daughter, Ms. Kathy Braswell, the Associational WMU Director.

Rev. Wallace concluded his report by announcing that a Mission Vacation Bible School is currently being conducted at Lake Royale.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Billy Tharrington. September 23, 1996

Moderator for the session was Rev. Gary McNair. Thirty-eight people were present, representing nineteen churches. Mr. Epp Catlett was appointed as Parliamentarian.

WMU Leadership Team Director Ms. Kathy Braswell reported that nine members of the team received state training. Thirteen participants attended the WMU Conference which was led by six members of the Leadership Team, at the Associational Key Leadership Conference. The WMU Fall Workshop has been rescheduled for September 30, due to Hurricane Fran. It will be held at Union Chapel. Mrs. Elaine Lewis will lead a book study, Five Steps to the Great Commission, on Oct 29, at Pilot for Women on Mission and older Acteens. On October 11-12, four members of the Leadership Team (Orfelinda Maravi, Nanette Warren, Elaine Lewis, and Kathy Braswell) will receive state training as WMU Specialized Workers. The Associational Baptist Women's Day of Prayer will be November 3, at Pine Ridge. The WMU Leadership Team will sponsor a booth at the craft bazaar at Louisburg Armory on November 1 and 2, to raise money for team members to go to South Africa. Craft items and baked goods are needed. Project HELP for 96-97 will focus on child advocacy. Tar River WMU will assist North Roanoke WMU with 200 Christmas boxes for inmates at the Fountain Correctional Center for Women in Rocky Mount.

Brotherhood Council Director Mr. Wayne Gupton expressed appreciation to those who helped with hurricane clean-up. He reported good attendance at the Baptist Men/RA Training which was held at the Associational Key Leadership Conference.

Sunday School Council Director Rev. Shelby Stephens reported that ten people attended the Sunday School session at the Associational Key Leadership Conference. He announced the Associational Sunday School Training School to be held on September 26, at Flat Rock Baptist Church.

Discipleship Supporter Rev. Jody Griffin reported that the Discipleship Support Team attended an update at Caraway in August. A study of the book <u>Faithquakes</u>, by Leonard Sweet, started on September 23, with several pastors in attendance. The Bible Drill Kickoff is rescheduled for October 7, at Spring Hope because of Hurricane Fran.

Rev. Bill Wallace, reporting for Evangelism Council Director Rev. DuPre Sanders and for Music Council Director Miss Nanette Warren, announced that the Evangelism Rally was cancelled due to the hurricane. A wonderful time was enjoyed by all at Hymn Sing I held on September 22, at Ephesus. Hymn Sing II will be September 29, at White Level.

Treasurer Mr. Pete Colbert presented the financial report for August. He also presented the Proposed budget for 1997. He made a motion to recommend the Proposed budget at the Fall Annual Meeting. The motion was seconded by Dr. C. Ray Pruette, and the vote carried.

Rev. Wallace announced that the interior trim and the light fixtures for the new associational building were paid for and needed installing.

Rev. Luis Maravi, Pastor at the Hispanic Mission at Strickland's Crossroads, reported that he had been visiting migrant camps and showing videos, distributing tracts, and giving out health kits. Average attendance at the mission has been as follows: sixty in June, sixty-five in July, and seventy in August. For three Sundays eighty people were in attendance. He reported that some of the people were now providing their own transportation to services. An anniversary revival was held. On the last day of the revival 120 people attended, two guest speakers were present, and a big meal was enjoyed by all. Vacation Bible School was held in July with fifty children in attendance, taught by nine of the mission members. Several from the mission attended a state-wide sporting event for Hispanic Missions. He announced a name change for the mission: Victoria En Cristo.

Vice-Moderator Mr. Adolphus Batchelor gave the Associational Council Report with a recommendation that each church be encouraged and asked to give \$1.00 per Sunday School member each year for the next five years to fund the South Africa Partnership. The vote carried.

Rev. Wallace presented the program for the Fall Annual Meeting. Dr. C. Ray Pruette made a motion that the program be adopted. The motion was seconded by Rev. Shelby Stephens, and the vote carried.

Rev. Wallace presented the tentative calendar for 1997. Dr. C. Ray Pruette made a motion that the tentative calendar be recommended at the Annual Meeting. The motion was seconded by Rev. Shelby Stephens, and the vote carried.

Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report, announced that any volunteers interested in hanging doors and doing other interior trim at the new associational building should call the office. Funding is needed to complete the building project. We still need to install cabinets, bookcases, and floor coverings. We need kitchen appliances, and furnishings for the large conference room. We also need to pave the parking lot. The Annual Fall Meeting will be at Samaria on October 21, with Holly Grove, Poplar Spring, and Stanhope assisting. A Diaper Changing Station and Cup of Cold Water booth was held at the Tar River Festival in Louisburg on September 21, and will be held at the Spring Hope Pumpkin Festival on October 5.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Rev. Ed Carroll.

- \$ 200.00 ASSOCIATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL TRAINING SCHOOL: This training event will provide an excellent opportunity for experienced and beginning Sunday School teachers and workers to get a better understanding of the characteristics and needs of the age-group with which they work. Supper will be provided. The date of this school is September 25.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL:

- \$ 400.00 LITERATURE AND SUPPLIES: VBS literature and necessary supplies will be provided for those on our VBS Council.
- \$ 50.00 STATE CLINIC: Our VBS Council will travel together to the State VBS Training Clinic to be held on February 28 or March 10. This allocation will cover travel expenses for our VBS Council.
- \$ 100.00 ASSOCIATIONAL VBS CLINICS: Two Vacation Bible School Clinics will be conducted. The first of these is our Early Bird Clinic, May 1. It is a dinner meeting and is for Pastors and VBS Directors only. The clinic for all VBS workers is scheduled for May 27.

DISCIPLESHIP TRAINING:

- \$ 140.00 DISCIPLESHIP STRATEGY MEETINGS (2 sessions at \$70.00 each): Two small group strategy meetings will be held to determine discipling directions. Participants will be invited based on their discipleship concerns. Budget will provide for promotion, materials and resources, and meals. One Strategy meeting will be held on January 21, and the other on May 20.
- ASSOCIATIONAL DISCIPLESHIP MODELS Two relevant discipling processes will be provided through the association to acquaint pastors and/or other church leaders with alternative discipling tools. Budget will provide facilitator honorarium, materials and supplies, and light refreshments for sessions.
- \$ 200.00 ASSOCIATIONAL BIBLE DRILL: An associational drill will be provided for children (grades 4-6), youth (grades 7-9), and Youth Speakers' Tournament (grades 10-12). Budget will provide drill supplies and associational recognition for the participants. This event is planned for April 6.
- \$ 50.00 BIBLE DRILL KICKOFF: An introductory rally will be offered on September 16, to acquaint children, youth, and drill leaders with the 1998 Bible Drill materials. Budget will provide various supplies and refreshments.
- \$ 225.00 DISCIPLESHIP PROJECTS: Specific discipling projects will be determined according to needs expressed in the strategy meetings. Budget will provide means to conduct various projects as then outlined. As many projects as possible will be conducted according to time and resources.

- \$ 45.00 ASSOCIATIONAL DISCIPLESHIP UPDATE: Associational leaders will be trained in the latest resources and discipling tools available to enable them to share intelligently with churches. Budget will provide for travel and registration fees for various training events. Training dates are August 22-23.
- \$ 350.00 DISCIPLESHIP RESOURCE PREVIEW: A dinner meeting will be provided on August 25 for pastors and spouses and a church leader and spouse for the purpose of exposing them to the latest discipling tools. A meal will be provided in order to provide an extended time period for the overview of relevant and needed discipling options.
- \$ 200.00 DEACON RENEWAL: A dinner event will be provided for deacons and spouses on March 6, for spiritual and functional renewal and revival. An after dinner speaker will provide spiritual nourishment and various conferences will provide functional helps.

W M U:

- \$ 300.00 WMU SPRING MEETING: This annual event is a time of reporting and reflecting on the past year's work, and promoting and hi-lighting the work of the new year. New officers are installed, fellowship is enjoyed, and inspiration and challenge are woven into the program. The date is April 7, and will be held at Sandy Creek.
- \$ 25.00 FALL WORKSHOP: The thrusts of this September 9, workshop is planning and coordinating the work of WMU for the new year. It will be held at Pearce.
- \$ 25.00 ASSOCIATIONAL BAPTIST WOMEN DAY OF PRAYER: This event is scheduled for November 2. Ernest prayer is its emphases.

BROTHERHOOD:

SOUTH AFRICA PARTNERSHIP: Men and women from churches within the association will be encouraged to be a part of a mission team to go to South Africa to do construction and other things. Those who participate will be urged to go on their own resources. Travel to and from the mission site will be paid from a designated account.

- \$ 250.00 ROYAL AMBASSADOR BASKETBALL: This program is basically self-supporting, but balls, score books, and other incidentals are needed to carry on this ministry. Play is on Saturdays during the months of January, February, and March, 1997.
- \$ 100.00 ROYAL AMBASSADOR CAR DERBY: Trophies will be awarded to the first and second place winners in the Lad and Crusader Divisions of competition. Trophies will also be awarded for "Best Car Design" and "Best Missions Project." The Derby is on the calendar for March 15.
- \$ 175.00 ROYAL AMBASSADOR TRACK MEET: Ribbons are awarded to first, second, and third place winners in each event. A trophy is awarded to the church that earns the highest number of total team points. This event is set for Saturday, April 19.



The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in generating endowment to enhance their permanent financial support. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased individual collective financial support. The Baptist Foundation is committed to assisting individual church members through creative stewardship methods to provide permanent financial undergirding of these ministries.

As of December 31, 1995, the Foundation held \$55,608,452 under management. In 1995, \$3,144,471 was distributed to Baptist work and \$1,125,383 was distributed to individuals for a total distribution of \$4,269,854.

The income distributions for the entire 76 year history of the N. C. Baptist Foundation totals: \$9,673,682 income paid to individuals and \$13,458,579 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$23,132,261.

In order to save churches large amounts of money and to increase the readership of the <u>Recorder</u>, Church News Service (CNS) was launched in 1990. This system lets any congregation have their church news incorporated into the <u>Biblical Recorder</u> which saves staff time, postage and printing costs. Usually, for less than what it costs to produce the church newsletter, CNS gives the entire Baptist communication package to each family in the congregation. Recent and anticipated increases in mailing costs makes CNS a greater value in 1996-97 than when it was started in 1990.

The paper focuses more and more attention on North Carolina Baptists with news, features and inspirational articles which will encourage individuals and churches in the witness and ministry. One sure way to conquer problems and overcome the barriers to effective witness and ministry is to have the facts, know the issues and be adequately informed.

Michael Owen jogged into view--carrying the
Olympic Torch on outstretched arm. Michael,

Olympic Torch on outstretched arm. Michael one of 1,422 children Baptist Children's Homes served in 1995-96, lives at Broyhill Home in Clyde, one of 12 facilities BCH operates in North Carolina.

Smiling and waving to the crowds holding aloft tiny flags and cameras, Michael lifted the symbol of international unity and pointed to friends among those who lined the parade route.

The entire Broyhill Home campus showed up, cheering wildly. They ate picnics at the end of Michael's route, and swarmed him when he passed the flame to the next carrier--a bicycle rider.

It could have been a family reunion, or a school scene, or a re-creation for a movie on family support. But Michael, and most of his supporters, are children who have suffered unspeakable abuses at the hands of adults they trusted to care for them.

And the adults who waded into that mob scene of joy at the end of Michael's run are called of God to help young people like Michael and those who surrounded him with those issues, and to overcome them.

As a boy, Michael was so ashamed of his clothes he ran home from school, never stopping to make friends. Worse, he endured almost nightly beatings from his father. He was 11 years old before he realized other boys weren't beaten every night. Four years later he found the courage to tell his father he was leaving.

"Go ahead, call someone," he yelled. "Leave."

Michael left. After six months in emergency care at Mills Home in Thomasville, he established a more permanent residence at Broyhill Home. Slowly, quietly his emotions mounted within him until one night he erupted and spilled forth his story, the years of secrets and lies, to his child care worker, Betty Porter. "She stayed up with me and we talked a long time," Michael said. That was his first lesson in trust and unconditional love.

"Broyhill has changed my life so much," Michael said. "For almost a year I didn't trust anybody, but finally I felt a calmness I know was the Lord. Here I found the Lord and now I try to live every day for Him."

Michael's story is repeated hundreds of times each year at Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. Not all are as dramatic as a boy who grew from a punching bag to a torch bearer.

But at four residential campuses, six emergency cottages, two homes for behaviorally troubled girls, a maternity home, a home for teenage mothers and their babies, therapeutic camping and model day care, more than 1,400 children and their families find help in a troubled time.

During the past year, BCH received almost \$1.5 million through the Cooperative Program, and \$663,00 through the Thanksgiving Offering. Total church gifts of almost \$3 million comprised 26.2 percent of BCH operating revenue.

BCH is in the midst of a \$10.1 "Light Their Way" Campaign to raise money for operations, capital needs and endowment. At the halfway point in June, more than \$5.4 million had been committed to BCH through the campaign.

Although Michael carries many fond memories of Baptist Children's Homes with him as he heads for college this Fall, his earliest amazements were the secure sleep he got when he laid his head down, and of receiving his first pair of Nikes so he didn't have to be embarrassed by his appearance.

Christian Action League of North Carolina, Inc. 1996 ANNUAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATION

In a recent survey released by the Family Research Council, 66% of those polled said that our country was headed down "the wrong track". When asked whether the nation's wrong direction could be attributed to the lack of jobs and economic health or a decline in moral values and family breakdown, over 60% indicated the latter. We at the Christian Action League agree that our state and nation need a restoration of biblical, moral and family values. In 1996 we were honored to assist communities in their battles for civic and moral righteousness and to promote laws in the General Assembly that have helped to restore family values to the State of North Carolina.

A. Christian Values

The Christian Action League joined with other Christian organizations to promote Christian Heritage Week in North Carolina, March 17-23. We experienced a wonderful week as presentations and commemorations were held in many churches, schools and communities across our state. The week culminated with an awards ceremony and reception for the winners of the state-wide essay contest and their families. The League provided decorations and programs for the event and hosted the reception at the State Archives and History Building in Raleigh.

The League undertook a project in association with the American Rights Coalition to distribute thousands of copies of the Ten Commandments through North Carolina. To date, over 5,000 copies of the 11 X 14 prints have been distributed throughout the state to individuals and churches.

B. Lottery

We saw renewed efforts to push a lottery bill through the General Assembly for a state-wide referendum. Representative Fitch introduced two lottery bills: HB 6060 (Rules Committee) and HB 838 (JII Committee). The League actively lobbied against these bills and both bills died in their respective committee. North Carolina continues to be the largest state in the nation and the only state in the Bible belt with no state-sponsored gambling. Please keep us in prayer as the League faces this battle each year.

C. Sex Education

CAL actively lobbied for HB 834, Abstinence Until Marriage, a law that mandated that abstinence until marriage be the focus in sex education in North Carolina schools and was passed in the 1995 session. CAL and other pro-family, Christian organizations have been working with the Dept. of Public Instruction and State Board of Education in 1996 encouraging them to implement the law through abstinence-based curricula. We have also assisted communities in seeing that this law is properly implemented at the local level.

D. Homosexuality

CAL participated in efforts to get SB 1487 (No Same-Sex Marriage) passed during the short session of the General Assembly. The bill passed both houses and became law.

Alerted our members in the Winston-Salem area about the Family March on June 30 and encouraged them to notify their churches to participate. This march was in response to the homosexual community march held in that city. The Family March attendance was estimated at 8,000.

E. Abortion

The League actively supported Representative Decker's HB 624, a Woman's Right to Know. This bill would have required the doctor to share vital information with the patient about the risks of abortion and would require a 24-hour waiting period. We were disappointed that the bill did not pass this session; however, we will work for its passage again next session.

F. Alcohol

Cal assisted several communities in setting up an organization to combat liquor referendums.

My friends, we are living in times when the Christian community needs to exercise discernment and stand strong for Biblical principles that further righteousness, strengthen families and bless our state and nation. We are grateful to God for the prayer and financial support that the League receives from the churches of your association that allows us to be on the front lines in this spiritual warfare.

Two colleges, Mars Hill and Chowan, have new presidents. Let us introduce them to you.

Dr. A. Max Lennon was named president of Mars Hill College, effective March 1. Both he and Mrs. Lennon (Ruth Ann) are graduates of Mars Hill. Dr. Lennon brings a rich background in business and higher education to his new task. After earning the B.S. and Ph.D. degrees at North Carolina State University, he served in the administration of Texas Tech University, the University of Missouri, Ohio State University and Clemson University, where he was the president. He comes to Mars Hill from the presidency of Eastern Foods, Inc. in Atlanta, Georgia. Dr. Lennon, an active Baptist churchman, has been a member of the National Fellowship of Baptist Men. In Atlanta they were members of the First Baptist Church in Peachtree City, where he taught Sunday School and was a member of the strategic planning committee. He is on the board of directors of numerous corporations and foundations, among them First Union Corporation and Duke Power. In accepting the presidency of Mars Hill he said, This is a wonderful opportunity to provide leadership for this college and boldly proclaim our faith in Jesus Christ.

Dr. Stanley G. Lott moved to North Carolina in July to become president of Chowan College. He comes from Louisiana College, a Baptist school, where he was vice president for academic affairs for 15 years. Earlier he has been a faculty member at Tift College in Georgia. Dr. Lott earned two doctorates, one in systematic theology from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, and the other in higher education administration from the University of Georgia. An ordained Baptist minister, he has held two pastorates in Louisiana. Home Mission Board, SBC 1995 Annual Report Summary/Highlights

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). With national offices in the Atlanta, Georgia area, the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

As of December 31, 1995, there were 4,857 missions personnel serving in the United States, the Caribbean, Guam, American Samoa, and Canada. The HMB also has endorsed more than 2,400 chaplains who are serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. Nearly 2,300 Mission Service Corps volunteers are serving on home mission field. During the year there were 1,458 church starts, the second highest number in 10 years. Southern Baptist churches baptized 393,811 people in 1995, an increase of nearly 15,000 over 1994.

Approximately half of the HMB's support comes from the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1995, gifts to the offering totaled \$38,908,339 the largest in HMB history. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1996 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$42 million. About 35 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

The following is a summary of program/support ministry highlights from 1995: Chaplaincy Ministries--The 2,412 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported more than 27,000 professions of faith. During the year, 179 Southern Baptist ministers were endorsed for the first time by the Chaplains Commission of the SBC.

Church Loans-The Church Loans Division closed 98 church loans totaling \$25 million, including \$3.4 million of refinancing.

Associational Administrative Service--In more than 1,025 associations, 950 associational missionaries have an extremely significant role in leading churches to strategize and work in partnership to evangelize, minister, and start churches in all places and among all people groups.

Language Missions--Home missionaries in the Language Church Extension Division worked among 106 ethnic groups and 98 American Indian tribes, using 106 languages and dialects, in addition to sign language.

Volunteers --Volunteers continue to serve in record numbers and represent more than \$100 million in value to the HMB. In 1995, more than 70,000 persons served as volunteers. Mission Service Corps missionaries, numbering 2,193, represent a cadre of committed people responding to God's call to be personally involved in home missions. They were responsible for leading more than 5,600 people to Christ.

Prayer and Spiritual Awakening--The Home Missions Intercessory Prayerline received 82,000 calls in 1995. Missionary prayer requests were given in more than 178,000 English and Spanish PrayerGrams.

Mass Evangelism--This department assisted in implementing the Here's Hope. Jesus Cares for You. Harvest Revivals. An estimated 25,000 to 35,000 churches participated in some portion of the Here's Hope emphasis.

Alternatives to Abortion Ministries--As a result of ministries in 37 crisis pregnancy centers, 806 persons prayed to receive Christ and 1,823 babies were born.

The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. 1996 Report to the Association "Meeting the Challenges of Health Care" HOSPITAL HIGHLIGHTS FOR 1996

DIVISION OF PASTORAL CARE

During this year the 18 to 40 Chaplains present at various times at the Hospital made over 55,000 pastoral contacts.

As of July 1, 1996, the counseling centers will be called CareNet, Inc., of The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. Over 26,000 hours of counseling were provided through the eleven centers across the state of North Carolina. Two additional centers will be open in the fall of this year.

The Center for Congregational Health has, since inception in 1992, provided ministry at some level to over 225 North Carolina Baptist churches.

Mission dollars from the Cooperative Program enabled the above ministries to be carried out and to touch thousands of lives.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

North Carolina Baptists joined us in a mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. We channeled every penny of the MDO, which amounted to \$461,647 to help patients who has no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. We are grateful to everyone who made this ministry possible.

POINTS OF EMPHASIS AND PROGRESS

Financial Stewardship - The Medical Center is constantly seeking ways to lighten the financial burden of those who are ill. Recently the room rates were reduced by \$50 per day.

Aegis - This is an alliance of primary-care clinicians who serve patients regardless of their medical plans or HMO/PPO affiliated. "Aegis" means protection or sponsorship: Aegis Family Health Centers is a network of primary care physicians affiliated with the Medical Center, It now has 33 providers in 10 practice sites.

QualChoice of North Carolina - QualChoice is the Medical Center's managed care company. Eighteen months old, it serves approximately 30,500 enrollees, giving quality health-care and patient/physician choice.

Regional Integrated Information Network - RIDS is a regional computer network now in the pilot phases. The network allows providers in the region to exchange patient information electronically, saving time and money. RIDS is a plan which assists communities in our service area to develop a coordinated continuum of care. In this plan, primary care physicians, community hospitals, nursing homes, and other patient care providers link their services with those of The Medical Center. The desired outcome is improved patient care and cost-effective services.

The J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging - The Center devotes itself to the special problems of older adults. When the center moves to its new home in 1996, its services will not only provide specialized health care but will also include a day care program for the elderly that will serve as a link between hospital and home, helping to reduce rates of rehospitalization and premature placement in nursing homes.

A CLOSING WORD

Since its founding in 1922, the Hospital has taken pride in our ministry of service. In doing so, we seek to make tomorrow's patient care and tomorrow's workplace constantly better. That has been our mission historically, and it continues to this day. I firmly believe that our best lies yet ahead, and I am committed to that reality.

The continuing goal of Baptist Retirement Homes is to provide more and better services for Older Adults. During 1996 several developments have moved us toward this goal.

> Some new staff members have been added to help provide the kind of total care which residents need and deserve. Tanja Keay has been employed as Vice President of the Health Services Division. Richmond came as the new manager of the Hamilton Baptist Home. Carla Hyde was named director of the small group program for residents with dementia, a program designed to enhance their quality of life. Patricia Fling is the director of the In Home Care program which began a few months ago. Dr. Earl Watts, an Associate Professor at the Bowman Gray School of Medicine, is serving as the medical director for In Home Care.

> Early in the year, renovation of the Hamilton Baptist Home was completed providing a more attractive and comfortable place for residents in that facility. The new Cecil and Gertrue Young Solarium at the Rickman Nursing Center in Asheville will provide space for the small group program for residents with dementia. At Brookridge, renovated space in the Assisted Living section, and named "Stokes Court", will house the new Assisted Independent Living Unit. A new passenger van will facilitate transportation for residents at the Taylor House in Albemarle as they attend church, keep appointments, go shopping, or participate in social/recreational events.

During the year, Baptist Retirement Homes has provided assistance in the planning for Cliffwood, a new continuing care retirement community being built in Fayetteville. Two Fayetteville churches, First Baptist and Snyder Memorial Baptist, have formed a non-profit corporation to lead this project. A 27 acre site has been selected. Plans call for 105 Independent Living units, 20 beds in Assisted Living, and 20 beds in a nursing care unit. All units will be available on a rental basis with no entrance fees.

The James M. Hayes Society has been formed to recognize and thank those persons who remember the Baptist Retirement Homes in their estate planning. Thirty-three charter members constitute this group named in honor of the "Homes" founding superintendent.

Finally, we recognize with deep gratitude those North Carolina
Baptists who gave through their churches to support the ministry during the past year. Through the cooperative program, the special February offering, and other church gifts, the "Homes" received a total of \$1,030,052 during the 12 month period ending September 30, 1995.



BYLAWS

Tar River Baptist Association, Inc.

PREAMBLE

For the declaration of its fundamental purposes and the permanent guidance and control of its activities, this body does adopt the following as its Bylaws, to wit: ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Corporation to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches; and to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Corporation. ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. There shall be two (2) classes of membership in the Corporation: voting and non-voting. The non-voting membership shall be composed of all of the members of the churches affiliated with the Corporation. Voting members of the Corporation shall be known as messengers and shall be elected annually by each of the individual churches affiliated with the Corporation in accordance with the following schedule: Each church is entitled to four (4) messengers. Any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred (200) is entitled to two (2) additional messengers per one hundred (100) members (or major fraction thereof) in excess of two (200) hundred. No church shall be entitled to more than ten (10) messengers.

SECTION 2. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Corporation shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The Corporation shall meet bi-annually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session. ARTICLE IV - RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE CORPORATION inspiration.

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Corporation by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator and the Director of Missions shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES OF THE CORPORATION

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Corporation by filing the Annual Church Profile; to send messengers to the bi-annual meetings of the Corporation; to give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare, and to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Corporation. The Corporation secretary (known as the Clerk) shall furnish the churches with the necessary printed forms and/or software for their Annual Church Profiles. These materials are to be distributed to the churches at least six (6) weeks before the Annual Fall session of the Corporation. The churches are requested to have the Church Profiles in the hands of the Clerk not less than two weeks before the fall meeting of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE CORPORATION

SECTION 1. The Corporation shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

SECTION 2. The Corporation may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that treats with contempt the purposes and requirements of the Corporation, or that applies for its own dismissal. The Corporation may also dissolve connection with any church that does not file a Church Profile or have messengers attending its Annual Fall Meetings for two (2) consecutive years.

ARTICLE VII - OFFICERS

The officers of the Corporation shall be: Director of Missions, Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Trustees.

ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS
SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to lead the Corporation to fulfill its mission faithfully, effectively, and lovingly. His role is three-dimensional: (1) mission strategist, (2) minister to the churches, pastors, and other church staff members, and (3) general leader of the Corporation. Within the limits of his time and ability, he is to respond to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Corporation.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Clerk (also known as the Secretary) to provide administrative support services to the Director of Missions and to the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. It shall also be the duty of the Clerk to record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the bi-annual meetings and of the Executive Board, and to make this information available on request. The Clerk shall use all diligence to have the record of transactions printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible; and to distribute to the church clerks reminders about, and forms for, the Annual Church Profile. The Clerk shall also serve as ex-

officio Secretary of the Executive Board.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to plan for and preside over the bi-annual and called meetings of the Corporation and the quarterly Executive Board meetings, and to encourage fellowship and mutual care among the churches. He shall open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. The Moderator shall appoint a Parliamentarian to serve at each meeting of the Corporation and the Executive Board Meetings. He shall also serve as ex-officio chairman of the Executive Board. The Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two (2) one-year terms in succession.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to assist in developing fellowship and mutual care among the churches and church leaders. He shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in the Moderator's absence, serve as vice-chairman of the Executive Board, and serve as Chairman of the Executive Council.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to assist in receiving, accounting, and disbursing of all the Corporation's monies as authorized by the Corporation or the Executive Board. By virtue of his office the Treasurer shall be

an ex officio member of the Finance Committee.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to act as the legal agents of the Corporation and shall hold title of all property of the Corporation. In the name of the Corporation they shall be authorized and empowered to receive title to real and personal property, and to sell and convey or mortgage same upon authority duly given by the Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. They are also responsible for keeping an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Corporation, a copy of which is to be kept on file in the Corporation's Office. The Trustees are to be three (3) in number, and they are to serve for a term of three (3) years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

The Committees of the Corporation are administrative in nature. These administrative Committees are as follows: Nominating; Credentials; Finance; Resolutions; Time, Place, and Preacher; Program; By-Laws; Christian Education; Strategy; Properties; History; and others deemed necessary or desirable. Each Committee shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. Committee members shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin immediately upon the adjournment of the Annual Fall Meeting of the Corporation. Members are allowed to serve more than one term in succession.

ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to nominate all officers, leaders, committeemen, and council representatives with the exception of the Director of Missions, the Clerk, and any other paid employees. This committee is to be appointed by the Moderator, and shall

retain at least two (2) of its members from the preceding year.

SECTION 2. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in determining when churches are of like faith and order, and when they can be properly accepted in the fellowship of

the Corporation. It is also the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Corporation as voting members of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in securing, administering, and reporting its finances. This committee will plan and propose an annual budget to the Executive Board and suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. This committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. At least two (2) of its members shall be retained from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as an ex-officiomember of this committee.

SECTION 4. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in studying resolutions for adoption by the Corporation or the Executive Board. This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Corporation's feelings in regard to the biannual meetings, officers of the Corporation, host churches, and other matters.

SECTION 5. The TIME, PLACE, and PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place, and preacher for the bi-

annual meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Corporation and the host pastors of the bi-annual meetings. It shall be their duty to assist the Corporation in planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Corporation. They shall receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form for the bi-annual meetings which, upon the adoption by the Corporation, shall become its order of business.

which, upon the adoption by the Corporation, shall become its order of business. SECTION 7. The BYLAWS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to make recommendations relative to Bylaw changes. This Committee shall receive all proposed changes and/or amendments to the Bylaws of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc., and upon study of said changes and/or amendments make recommendations to the Corporation concerning said changes and/or amendments.

SECTION 8. The CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to keep before the churches of the Corporation

all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

SECTION 9. The STRATEGY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in determining strategic objectives and staying on course in achieving them.

SECTION 10. The PROPERTIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in properties administration. This Committee shall develop and recommend policies and procedures for using the Corporation's facilities and equipment.

SECTION 11. The HISTORY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the

Corporation's life and work.

ARTICLE XI - INSTITUTIONAL AND AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES

The Denomination's Institutional and Agency Representatives shall include the following: Annuity Board, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes, Christian Higher Education, Religious Literature, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Mission. The representatives for these institutions and agencies shall be responsible for providing information to the churches during the year, and/or giving reports on the work of the institutions and agencies at the biannual meetings of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XII - MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

The Mission Performance Councils undergird and give support to the work of program related ministries of the Corporation. Training leadership shall be a

primary responsibility of these Councils. All Mission Performance Councils shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. These Mission Performance Councils are as follows: Seminary Extension, Ordination Advisory, Music, Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Vacation Bible School, Recreation, Media Library, Pastoral Ministries, Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions Development, Youth Ministry, and Family Ministry.

ARTICLE XIII - DUTIES OF THE MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS SECTION 1. The SEMINARY EXTENSION COUNCIL shall direct any Seminary Extension Program for the churches affiliated with the Corporation. This Council shall be composed of at least (5) members.

SECTION 2. The ORDINATION ADVISORY COUNCIL shall be composed of at least (5) members. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to act only in an advisory capacity for churches seeking assistance in examining prospective candidates approved for ordination. This Council shall conduct its work within the guidelines

SECTION 3. The MUSIC COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. This Council shall plan and implement the music program of the Corporation. They shall recommend to the Program Committee the music for the bi-annual meetings, and

they shall enlist accompanists for all Corporation Meetings.

SECTION 4. The SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of the ASSISTeam to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate Sunday School Work.

SECTION 5. The DISCIPLESHIP SUPPORT TEAM shall be composed of at least two (2) members and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of this team to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the total Discipleship

SECTION 6. The WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION shall consist of the leadership recommended by the WMU Nominating Committee and elected by the Corporation's WMU. This Council will have the responsibility of planning, promoting, conducting, and

SECTION 7. The BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL shall be composed of the officers of the Corporation's Brotherhood. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the work of Baptist Men and also the work of Royal Ambassadors.

SECTION 8. The VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. The Vacation Bible School Council Director is the leader of the VBS Team and shall plan and promote the Corporation's VBS Clinics. The age-group VBS leaders who comprise this team shall be responsible for conducting the VBS Clinics.

SECTION 9. The RECREATION COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members whose duty it shall be to help plan, coordinate, promote, and conduct the entire recreation program of the Corporation. They shall be available to assist any entity of the Corporation with the planning and conducting of recreational activities. The work of this Council includes setting up and supervising the Basketball Program, and any other Sports Program that may be started. This Council will also plan, promote, and conduct the Annual Royal Ambassador Track Meet, and the Annual Royal Ambassador SECTION 10.

The MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL shall consist of at least three (3) members. This Church Media Library Organization is often referred to as TACMO. shall be the responsibility of this Council to provide for the mutual sharing of inspiration and information for furthering the Church Media Center Ministry of the

SECTION 11. The PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL shall be composed of the following: (1) Pastoral Ministries Director, (2) Church Administration Services Coordinator, (3) Deacon Ministry Coordinator, (4) Vocational Guidance Coordinator, and (5) Church Weekday Education Coordinator, and any others that may be deemed necessary or advisable. The duties of this Council shall be to determine the pastoral ministries emphasis needed or desired and to schedule the events in cooperation with the total programming of the Corporation. The major task of the Council shall be the development and training of ministers through conferences, workshops, clinics, awareness meetings, retreats, and ministry support groups.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. It shall be the duty of this Council to plan and promote any evangelism programs,

training projects, and rallies needed or desired. It shall also be the

responsibility of this Council to keep evangelism before the pastors and laypeople

of the Corporation.

SECTION 13. The STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for stewardship development and promotion within or among the churches of the Corporation. It will be the task of this Council to seek to lead the churches to set specific, attainable, measurable stewardship goals.

SECTION 14. The MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall consist of at least seven (7) members. This Council shall be responsible for missions development in the total program of the Corporation. The Council shall not only be concerned with already established missions, mission work, and mission activities; it shall be concerned with beginning new mission work. It will be their responsibility to study the missionary needs of the Corporation and make recommendations concerning new work. They shall also recommend missions projects or activities with which the churches in the Corporation may cooperate. They shall strive to get each church in the Corporation to elect or appoint a Church Mission Development Council.

SECTION 15 The YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least (5) members, shall be responsible for planning youth related ministries for the Corporation including

retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

SECTION 16. The FAMILY MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for helping to plan, promote, and conduct any program emphasis related to family life. This Council should strive to include the needs of senior adults, single adults, marriage partners, parents, and children.

ARTICLE XIV - THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Executive Council shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, the Directors of the various Program Councils, and three members at large. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to assist the Director of Missions in planning, coordinating, promoting, and executing the Corporation's Programs, making recommendations to the Executive Board or to the Corporation in its Annual Fall Meeting. It shall also be the duty of this Council to plan the annual calendar. This Council shall meet quarterly on another Monday evening prior to each Executive Board meeting, and at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or Moderator.

ARTICLE XV - THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Corporation Officers and key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Pastor, Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Board Members shall be members of the church they represent. If a church does not have one or more of these leaders, it may appoint a substitute for each vacancy and shall submit the name/names with the church profile.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall meet quarterly usually during March, June, September, and November on Monday night following the fourth Sunday of the month unless a conflict necessitates moving the meeting to Monday after the third or fifth Sunday. The Executive Board may meet at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator for the purpose of transacting special or

urgent business.

SECTION 3. Although each church should earnestly strive to get its full contingent of key leaders to attend, there is no quorum requirement for transacting business at a regular or called meeting of the Executive Board.

SECTION 4. The Director of Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive

Board and does not have the power to vote.

SECTION 5. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as follows:

- a. The Executive Board is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary, and to define his duties.
 - b. To act for the Corporation between regular sessions of the body.
 - To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching

e. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Corporation the annual budget, to of stewardship. recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director

of Missions relative to the program to be fostered by the Corporation.

f. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Board in the name of the Corporation shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XVI - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Corporation, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XVII - AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of the Corporation's meeting. The said amendment(s) must be presented to the afternoon session and voted on no earlier than the evening session.

ARTICLE XVIII - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES

The business of the Corporation shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE XIX - BUSINESS PROCEDURE

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session

which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Corporation or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under

consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator, and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

Any resolution to be presented to the Executive Board and/or bi-annual meetings must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Corporation and published in the Corporation's newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one 8.

member of the body as temporary chairman.

- 9. Each Fall Session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the annual sermon.
- 10. Reports of committees must be brief not exceeding five hundred words. Other reports should not exceed three hundred words each.

11.

The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Librarian of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina; Biblical Recorder, Raleigh, North Carolina; Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina; Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee; and State Baptist Convention.

13. The host churches of the bi-annual meetings shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words). These histories shall be printed in the annual

minutes of the Corporation.

Spring Session Held at Pearce Baptist Church Assisted by Perry's Chapel and Pleasant Grove April 21, 1997

THEME: We Are Family

AFTERNOON SESSION

Moderator: Gary McNair

(Note from Clerk: Some reports are not printed in the Proceedings. They are placed in this annual following the proceedings.)

The 167th Semi-Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Moderator Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church. He read the theme scripture John 17:21.

2. Mr. Matthew Queen, Union Chapel Baptist Church, led in singing the hymn "Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee."

3. Rev. McNair expressed appreciation to the host churches.

Rev. Mark Cottrell, Pearce Baptist Church, read scripture (Ephesians 4:1-6) and led in prayer.

5. Rev. McNair organized the session, and appointed Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock

Baptist Church, as parliamentarian.

- 6. Vice Moderator Adolphus Batchelor, Holly Grove Baptist Church, presented the program and made a recommendation that it be adopted as printed, with one correction that Ms. Georgette Guin would give the WMU Report in the absence of Ms. Kathy Braswell. The vote carried.
- 7. Rev. Bill Wallace, Director of Missions for Tar River Baptist Association, recognized and welcomed the following new pastors and/or staff: Mr. Matthew Queen, Minister of Music/Youth at Union Chapel; and Rev. Mark Cottrell, Pastor at Pearce.
- 8. The histories of the host churches were presented by Ms. Eloise Stallings of Pearce, Mrs. Dorothy Renn of Perry's Chapel, and Mrs. Florine Braswell of Pleasant Grove.
 - 9. Mr. Queen led in singing the hymn "God The Father Of Your People."

10. Rev. McNair expressed appreciation to the instrumentalists: Mrs. Joann Wallace

and Miss Nanette Warren, both from Pilot Baptist Church.

11. Rev. George Bowman brought greetings from the NC Baptist Hospital. He reported that over four hundred thousand dollars was received from NC Baptists in the Mother's Day Hospital Offering in 1996. The goal for 1997 is five hundred thousand. 12. Rev. Wallace reported that at the March Associational Board meeting it was suggested that an offering be received at the Semi-Annual meeting for the new associational building. Construction began on the building two years ago, and still is not completed. Needed to be installed are cabinets, floor coverings, kitchen appliances, and plumbing fixtures. We also need to gravel the parking lot. About \$45,000 is needed to complete the building project. It was also suggested at the March Board meeting that the churches be encouraged to give five dollars per resident member towards the new associational building. Rev. Wallace encouraged prayer and financial support for the completion of the building.

13. Rev. McNair led in an offertory prayer, and an offering was received for the

new associational building (\$1,018.40).

- 14. Mr. Queen led in singing the hymn "Blest Be The Tie That Binds."
- 15. Mrs. Wendy Edwards, Spring Hope First Baptist Church, announced that two people had joined the Discipleship Support Team. Rev. Carl Poole, Rock Spring Baptist Church, will focus on Deacons. Mrs. Lynn Lloyd, Maple Springs Baptist Church, will focus on women. Mrs. Edwards reported that a Deacon Renewal Services was held on March 6 at Rock Spring Baptist Church. Seventeen churches were represented and 154 meals were served. Each pastor and deacon chairperson that attended the renewal service will receive a book entitled "Time For A Check-Up" by Alice Cullinan. Twelve children representing Oak Grove, Sandy Creek, and Spring Hope Churches participated in the Associational Bible Drill on April 6 at Spring Hope First Baptist Church. All the children successfully completed the drill and will go to the state drills. Also on April 6 a presentation was made by a youth speaker, Stephie Vernon, from the Raleigh Association. Invitations have been mailed to the May strategy meeting. A Discipleship Resource Preview will be held on August 25. Following the Discipleship Report, Mrs. Edwards, Rev. Poole, and Rev. Jody Griffin,

Spring Hope First Baptist Church, did a drama presentation emphasizing that discipleship and spiritual growth includes many ingredients. They presented a challenge for each church to either start a discipleship program or to strengthen

the existing one.

16. Rev. David Averette, Franklinton Baptist Church, announced that the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team(ASSISTeam) is now called the Associational Consultant Team (ACTeam). The Tar River ACTeam received training to prepare them to lead the Associational Sunday School Training School on September 25. ACTeam members that were present were introduced as follows: Rev. David Brooks, Centerville, works with pastors; Mrs. Libby Anders, Flat Rock, works with teachers of youth; Miss Heather Nelms, Sandy Creek, works with teachers of preschool; and Rev. Kenny Byrd, Philadelphia, works with teachers of adults. The ACTeam is qualified to help you, and will be glad to come to your church upon invitation.

- 17. Ms. Georgette Guin, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, reporting for WMU Director Kathy Braswell, Philadelphia Baptist Church, gave the following WMU report. Thirtyseven women participated in a study of the book Five Steps to the Great Commission: A Study of the WMU Tasks, led by Elaine Lewis on October 29. Forty people attended the Associational Baptist Women's Day of Prayer held at Pine Ridge on November 3, led by Mildred Thompson. An offering of \$109.00 was received for the Women's Department of the Baptist World Alliance. Nanette Warren and Nancy Leonard led an Associational GA Foreign Mission Study on November 8. Thirty-one girls and leaders, representing four churches (Pilot, Sandy Creek, Ephesus, and Philadelphia) participated. Sixteen people gathered at Rocky Cross Baptist Church to pack Christmas boxes for the women at the Fountain Correctional Center in Rocky Mount on November 23. Plans are being made to do this project again this year. Six church WMU groups were represented at the Brown Bag Lunch on Feb. 15 at Philadelphia Baptist Church. Ninety-eight attended the WMU Annual Spring Meeting on April 7 at Sandy Creek Baptist Church. The program featured special music by the Sandy Creek Children's Choir and by a group of girls from the Kennedy Children's Home in Kinston. The Acteens are sponsoring a Missions Fair at Duke Memorial Baptist Church on May 17. Other upcoming events include: a Creative Ministries Workshop on May 31 at Sandy Creek Baptist Church, the Fall workshop on September 9 at Pearce Baptist Church, and the Day of Prayer on November 2 at Oak Grove Baptist Church. Rev. Jody Griffin, reporting for Vacation Bible School Council Director Jenny
- Alford, Ephesus Baptist Church, reported that the Early Bird VBS Clinic is scheduled for May 1 at Louisburg Baptist Church, and the VBS Clinic for all VBS workers is scheduled for May 27 at Ephesus Baptist Church.

19. Mrs. Libby Anders presented a dramatic presentation emphasizing the importance of deep roots. She said that we should thank God that our churches are part of an association that has deep roots, and reminded us that we are family.

20. Rev. C. W. Driver, Union Chapel Baptist Church, read scripture (1 Corinthians

12:4-31) and led in prayer.

21. Mrs. Sandra Wood, Red Bud Baptist Church, presented special music, "The Old Rugged Cross".

22. Director of Missions Bill Wallace preached the annual sermon.

23. Rev. McNair expressed appreciation to Vice Moderator Adolphus Batchelor for presiding over the evening session in his absence.

24. Mrs. Dorothy Renn gave thanks for the evening meal.

EVENING SESSION Vice Moderator: Adolphus Batchelor Instrumentalists: Menia Perry, Pearce and Nanette Warren, Pilot

1. The evening session was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Vice-Moderator Adolphus Batchelor, Holly Grove Baptist Church.

2. Mrs. Sandra Hough, Samaria Baptist Church, led in a time of singing various hymns selected by the congregation.

- 3. Miss Nanette Warren announced that the Music School scheduled for April 29 would be rescheduled, and that two Hymn Sings were scheduled for September.
- 4. Rev. Jody Griffin, Spring Hope First Baptist Church, did a dramatic presentation emphasizing the different ministry opportunities within the association.
- 5. Rev. Jack Rose, Pleasant Grove Baptist Church, read scripture (John 14:6-19) and led in prayer.

6. Mrs. Hough led in singing two hymns: "We Are One In The Bond Of Love" and "The Family Of God".

7. Treasurer Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the monthly financial report for March 1997 and the annual financial report for 1996. She expressed appreciation to the churches for their financial support. She also expressed appreciation to the members of the finance committee who meet on a monthly basis. She expressed gratitude to those churches that were giving five percent or better to the association, and encouraged those churches not giving five percent to increase their giving to the association.

8. Rev. Bill Wallace announced that the bill for the brick work on the new building has been received. He reported that at the March Associational Board Meeting it was suggested that each church donate five dollars per resident member

towards the new associational building.

9. Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report, reported that he and six other men had gone on a mission trip to South Africa. Three of the men, Rev. Jay Meadows, Mr. Jimmy Layton, and Mr. Philip Rice, were from Duke Memorial Baptist Church. These three had done construction work and conducted Bible studies in the Atlantis area. He then introduced the other members of the team and gave them an

opportunity to share.

10. Rev. Duane Caldwell, Bailey Baptist Church, said that while in South Africa he was impressed by the fact that businesses closed on Sunday and preaching was allowed in the schools. He participated in the services at the schools where the team members preached, gave testimonies, did drama, and gave an invitation with a tremendous response. This type of thing is not allowed in America. He had also gone into the home of a Jehovah's witness and was asked "When did Baptist start going door-to-door?" He said it was important to go on mission trips, but emphasized that lost people were all around us. He said that some people might not go on a mission trip because of the expense. He shared that he had the same concern, but his church raised the money for him to go. He emphasized that if God calls you to go, God will provide.

11. Mr. Tom Drupple, Ephesus Baptist Church, said that he had many meaningful experiences while in South Africa, but the greatest was when he went with Bill Wallace door-to-door witnessing. They had visited a young mother. Mr. Drupple shared his testimony with her, and Rev. Wallace led her through the plan of

salvation. She prayed to receive Christ before they left.

12. Rev. David Averette, Franklinton Baptist Church, expressed appreciation to Tar River Baptist Association for agreeing to be in partnership with South Africa. He shared about an incident while in South Africa in which a man asked him how it felt to live in the strongest country in the world. Rev. Averette could not answer that question. He asked the question to those attending the Semi-Annual Meeting. He then asked, "Are we blessed by it? Do we take it for granted? Or do we use the opportunity we have to serve Christ?"

13. Rev. Wallace announced that a new Hispanic Ministry will begin on Saturday and Sunday, April 26-27, at Franklinton, and will be sponsored by the Franklinton Baptist Church. He introduced the minister for the new work, Rev. Grady Nowell.

14. Rev. Nowell said that he was privileged to serve in Honduras for twenty-five years. He returned to the United States two years ago, and retired from the Foreign Mission Board. He recently met with Rev. Wallace, and Rev. DuPre Sanders, Franklinton Baptist Church, to discuss the possibilities of starting a new work for Hispanics in Franklinton. He also met with the committee at the Franklinton Church. He said that he was looking forward to beginning this ministry. The Hispanics in the area have been invited to a fiesta on Saturday, and then the first Bible Study will be held on Sunday at Franklinton Baptist Church.

15. Rev. Wallace recognized members of the Franklinton Baptist Church that were present. He then introduced Charlie Morgan, pastor of the Damascus Road Baptist

Fellowship.

16. Rev. Morgan reported that the mission had started in a motorcycle shop, and then moved to his house. The motorcycle mission then moved to the Stanhope Methodist Church building. The building had to be cleaned and repaired, and the lights had to be turned on. Furniture was donated. Five people had been attending the services at his home on a regular basis. Seventeen attended the first service in the Stanhope Methodist Church building on December 1, 1996. Recently three people have been baptized. He emphasized that the Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship looked at the inside of a person, not the outside. He said that they originally were in the Raleigh Baptist Association, but were glad to now be a part of the Tar

River Baptist Association. He closed his report by announcing that the mission had an excess of food and clothes, and he would be glad to give it to anyone that needed

it. Rev. Wallace gave members of the South Africa Mission Team Certificates of 17. Appreciation from the Foreign Mission Board.

18. Mrs. Hough led in singing the hymn "When We All Get To Heaven".

An offering for the new building was received (\$547).

19. 20. 20. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reporting for the Credentials Committee, said that attendance at the Spring 1997 meeting was as follows: thirtyfour churches and two missions represented by ninety-two messengers, seven alternates, twenty-four pastors, fifteen associational officers, and twenty-seven visitors for a total of 165 people.

21. Rev. Tom Eldridge, Bunn Baptist Church, reporting for the Resolutions Committee, made a motion that the following resolutions be adopted:

RESOLUTION 1: Whereas, Pearce Baptist Church, assisted by Pleasant Grove Baptist Church and Perry's Chapel Baptist Church, has hosted Tar River Baptist Association's Semi-Annual Meeting, and whereas, they have provided graciously of God's blessings, fellowship, and food; Be it therefore resolved that we hereby express to each church our appreciation for their loving, gracious, and allsufficient efforts to provide for the needs of all who attended this session of the Tar River Baptist Association.

RESOLUTION 2: Whereas, the Reverend Gary McNair has faithfully served as Moderator of our Association, presiding with godliness, dignity, and expertise; Be it therefore resolved that we express to the Reverend McNair our love with genuine gratitude for the leadership he has provided throughout his term of service.

RESOLUTION 3: Whereas, the Reverend Bill Wallace has served the Tar River Baptist Association with vision, commitment, energy, and with unselfishness; and whereas, his love for our Savior Jesus Christ is evident in his words, actions, and demeanor; and whereas, he sacrificially loves each Association church, church member and pastor; Be it therefore resolved that we express to the Reverend Wallace our love and appreciation and commit to pray for his ministry to the glory of God.

RESOLUTION 4: Whereas, Ms. Georgette Guin faithfully serves as our Association Secretary and Clerk with devotion and expertise; and whereas, she daily assists churches and individuals with patience and love for Christ; Be it therefore resolved that we express our love and gratitude to Ms. Guin for the spirit with which she serves and the quality of work she accomplishes.

The vote carried.

22. Mrs. Joy Joyner, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, presented special music "People

Need The Lord".

23. After an introduction by Rev. Wallace, Miss Mildred McWhorter from Franklin, Georgia, retired Home Missionary who previously worked with Inner-City Missions in Texas, shared out of her background of experiences and knowledge. 24. After closing comments, Mr. Batchelor adjourned the meeting with prayer.

HISTORY OF PEARCE BAPTIST CHURCH

Following a revival meeting held at the Old Pearce Schoolhouse in the Spring of

1915, the Pearce Aminy Baptist Church was organized.

W. D. Harrington and C. T. Plyborn conducted this meeting and led in the organization of the Church on April 25, 1915. Thirty-nine members signed the covenant. The records show sixty-nine members transferred their membership from other churches, principally from Poplar Springs Baptist Church. These are referred to as charter members. The first deacons were: J. R. L. Pearce, H. S. Pearce, B. F. Pearce, H. K. Privette, E. C. Arnold, W. H. Privette, and C. W. Perry.

It is not clear exactly when the church building was started, but according to Mr. S. G. Phillips, the work was begun in 1917 and completed in 1918 at the approximate cost of \$800 to \$1000. Mr. Phillips was the overseer of the work and most of the materials and labor were donated. In November the name Aminy was

dropped and the present name adopted.

A storm nearly tore the church off the foundation in 1936, and plans were laid to erect a new church. Work began in January 1938 and was completed in 1939. The present church interior was completed in 1949 with a loan of \$1500 from J. W. Perry, Sr. During the year 1952 the church added a balcony and vestibule, painted the interior, renovated the choir loft, put a new top on the church, installed rest

rooms, and put carpet on the floor.

In October 1953, the church voted to build a parsonage. \$2000 was raised on Homecoming of that year, and \$12,000 was borrowed to complete the work. Mr. J. W. Perry, Sr. gave the brick, and several others donated labor. The lot was given by Mr. Jeff Pearce and family. The total cost of this attractive eight room home was

The school property was acquired in February 1956 at the cost of \$2000. We also joined the Tar River Baptist Association.

From 1959-1963 major remodeling of the annex was completed. A breezeway connecting the church and annex was built in memory of J. W. Perry, Sr.

We celebrated our fiftieth anniversary in 1965. At that time we installed memorial stained glass windows. The baptistery was installed with the painting donated by L. D. and Inez Pearce.

We have been served by four pastors and two interim pastors since 1985. During 1995 we built a playground with proceeds made from the concession stand at the Tar River Baptist Association softball games. In April 1996 we started a project to renovate our sanctuary. We repaired and painted walls, added crown molding, and installed new lighting with chandeliers donated in honor or memory of various people. We also added new carpet and pew covers.

Mark Cottrell was called as our full time pastor in January 1997. Four ordained ministers of the Gospel have come from this fellowship: Roy J. Smith,

Johnny J. Smith, Coye Jeans Jr., and Ronald S. Pierce.

Our history is part of a bigger family, THE FAMILY OF GOD.

HISTORY OF PERRY'S CHAPEL BAPTIST CHURCH

When members of the Shiloh Interdenominational Church near Cap Rock decided to disband in 1844, Jeremiah Perry sold some of them the present site of Perry's Chapel Baptist Church for one dollar. The transaction was made with Rev. Josiah Crudup, Allen C. Perry, Levin Perry, Jordan R. Sherrod, and Joshua Perry as trustees and managers, and to their successors forever to build thereon a meeting house for the Baptist denomination of Christians in that section. They could have a church and worship Almighty God agreeably to the dictates of their own conscience. This transaction was recorded the seventh day of September 1844. This group soon organized Perry's Chapel Baptist Church.

Perry's Chapel has belonged to the Tar River Baptist Association from its beginning, and in 1855 the church was host to the Annual Associational Meeting. five months after the War Between the States, on September 29, 1865, a letter was granted to the church to affiliate with any other association of like faith and order. A week later the church was received into the Central Association.

The first record of any Sunday School at Perry's was in 1871. During the period 1883-1885, the first Woman's Missionary Society was organized. It was during these years that the first musical instrument, an organ, was purchased. About 1886 the present building was erected. During 1903-1908 the church was enlarged, painted, and renovated. In 1906 the church printed its Articles of Faith and Church Covenant, distributing it to all the members.

In 1918 the Central Association met with the church for the second time, and that year the church went to half-time services, meeting only two Sundays each month. The Central Association met twice at Perry's Chapel during the 1930's. than 200 were present at the 1931 meeting, and the crowd was so large in 1939 the building could not accommodate everyone.

The Central and Raleigh Associations combined in 1944, and Perry's was a member of the Raleigh Association until 1957 when the church was again received into the

Tar River Association.

June 4, 1944 marked the Centennial Celebration and Homecoming. There was dinner on the grounds and a roll call of membership. Recognition was given to twenty-two men serving in the Armed Forces at that time; three of whom were killed in action.

In 1956 the church went on a full-time program and provided a pastorium. 1957 the church had grown to a membership of 236, and a church history had been compiled by Thomas M. Elmore. Additional Sunday School rooms were provided, and in 1962 the church purchased a Hammond organ. The church sanctuary was remodeled in the fall of 1967 with the addition of new pews, pulpit furniture, communion table, and carpet. Ten memorial windows were installed beginning in 1968. In 1971 the

church was painted, walkways poured, a new piano was given in memorial, an outside bulletin board was erected, and the parsonage was repaired and painted.

On June 26, 1977 a ground breaking ceremony was held after the worship service for an education building and on May 18, 1980 it was dedicated with no indebtedness. In January 1986 the WMU of Perry's Chapel had a Centennial Celebration honoring the 100 years of progress. On June 29, 1986 a dedication service was held for the new baptistery, and five were baptized at the service.

Perry's Chapel and Union View churches hosted to the Tar River Association Meeting on October 19,1987. The Elmore Scholarship Fund was established by the

Elmore family.

In 1988, a retaining wall and a deck were built at the parsonage. It was also painted inside and out and new carpet installed. The church sanctuary was painted, new carpet installed, and a new Allen organ was purchased with memorial funds given to the church in memory of friends and loved ones. A dedication service was held on

July 24 for the organ and re-dedication of the sanctuary.

In 1989, the second church directory was completed and delivered. High attendance Sunday was March 19 with 125 in attendance. Spring Revival services were held in May. A Baptist Doctrine study was held in April. High school and college graduates were honored on May 28, and Bibles were presented to each. Pew cushions were installed by an anonymous donor. Twelve adults went to Charlotte to help the victims of hurricane Hugo. Homecoming was celebrated on October 13 with Dr. Steven Bolton, a former pastor as speaker. Approximately 140 attended.
A Simultaneous Revival "Here's Hope" was held in April 1991. Rev. Ron Freeman

brought the messages. Vacation Bible School was held, and the offering sent to the

Hamptons in Indonesia.

Rev. Bryan Hatcher accepted the call as pastor to Perry's Chapel and his duties began on June 1, 1991. The annual pig-picking was held in July. The VBS offering was sent to the Baptist Children's Home.

A former pastor, Michael Hampton, his wife Patty, and their children, presently missionaries to Indonesia, visited and told of their experiences on January 5, 1992. The Rev. Jimmy Hatcher, Director of Missions for Catoosa Baptist Association in Ringgold, GA was the guest preacher for our May revival. Rev. Don Stroud, a former pastor, brought the homecoming message on October 11.

During January 1993, Rev. Bryan Hatcher taught the book "Christian Caregiving" in a series of Sunday nights. Repairs were made to the vinyl siding on the church. Tanya Journigan volunteered her time as Youth Director for the summer. A Sesquicentennial Committee was appointed to make plans for the celebration in 1994. A new church directory was compiled for the celebration. The heating and airconditioning system at the pastorium was replaced. Following the Christmas Cantata, a reception was held for the pastor and his wife who were leaving, effective 1993. Rev. William Parise served as pastor from December 1994 - April 1997.

From 1892-1988 Perry's Chapel ordained eight men. From 1844-1993 Perry's

Chapel was served by forty-six pastors.

Perry's Chapel has been blessed for many years, and we seek the power of the Holy Spirit to lead us for many years to come.

HISTORY OF PLEASANT GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

Pleasant Grove Baptist Church was organized in 1851 after having held meetings under a bush arbor during the summer months on property belonging to N. W. Boddie. Information handed down and church census records show that N. W. Boddie built the first church structure on his land for the local people to hold services because of the distance to other churches. He served as church clerk until 1875.

Thirty-six years later in 1887, N. W. Boddie gave the church a deed for "2 acres, 2 rods and 9 poles to have and to hold...so long as the church is held by the Missionary Baptists, and in case the church goes down then to revert to me and my heirs..." Anna B. Bunn, only heir, deeded the same property in fee simple to the

church on February 23, 1953.

Church census records show as many as twelve slave members from 1861 to 1892.

One former slave, C. E. Boddie, was buried on the church grounds in 1911. Two Baptist churches have been organized from this church, viz: Corinth and

The basic church structure is still being used, although it has been remodeled and renovated several times with additions being made. An old vacated school building was moved from across the road in 1934 and joined onto the back of the church to form an educational department.

An annex building containing a large assembly room, a kitchen, and a utility room was constructed in 1947.

In March 1953 the church borrowed \$4000 to help with remodeling, re-decorating, and brick-veneering the church. The cost was \$10,000. The next year bathrooms were added behind the sanctuary leading to the educational department. In 1956 the debt was paid.

New pews and other furniture was purchased in March 1957 at a cost of \$2369.17. In October 1959 gas heaters were installed, nursery facilities added, and

concrete walks completed.

Fourteen thousand dollars was borrowed in November 1963 to renovate and remodel the sanctuary, to install a baptistry, to construct a new educational department, to install heat and air conditioning, and to purchase new furniture. The project was completed in late 1964 for a total of \$16,216, and the debt was paid on December 3, 1968.

A deep well was drilled in 1970 at a cost of \$670.

In February 1973 plans were approved and a project was begun to renovate and re-decorate the sanctuary and to change and replace the canopy over the front door. The cost of this project was \$8,000.

A church sign was donated and erected by the Eugene Braswell family in April 1973.

The first Constitution and By-laws of the church was adopted on November 1, 1973 under the leadership of Pastor Lonnie Ray Armstrong. Wrought iron hand rails were mounted by the front steps of the church in 1973 in memory of Joseph Z. Hinton by his family.

In the fall of 1974, new pews were installed in the sanctuary. On September 15, 1974 Lonnie R. Armstrong, serving as pastor to both Pleasant Grove and Castalia churches, resigned from both churches. The church dissolved its affiliation with Castalia on October 6, 1974, and became a full-time church on January 1, 1975, with Norris Cook serving as pastor.

Plans were made immediately to acquire additional property across the road for the construction of a parsonage. A survey showed the church owned 3.22 acres. Aubrey D. and Peggy B. Woodruff donated an additional .19 acre. Plans were made to build a parsonage containing 1800 square feet at an estimated cost of \$40,000 and

construction began on February 23, 1975.

On August $\bar{5}$, 1975 Miss Virginia Bridgers deeded to the church a .68 acre tract of land upon condition that the land would be used as additional cemetery space.

A special note burning ceremony was held on February 7, 1977 to commemorate the special challenges of becoming a full-time church, building a parsonage, and becoming debt free in the preceding two years.

On June 1979, church drives were paved at a cost of \$2,704.

In July 1982 a memorial baptistry painting was placed in the church in memory of Joseph Milton Braswell by his family.

A steeple was erected on the church in 1983 in memory of Eugene Braswell and in

honor of his wife, Effie Braswell. Wheelchair ramps were built in 1983.

On May 19, 1985 a dedication service was held for the renovation and additions to the church annex. These included a room (20 x 24 feet), two restrooms, storage, and air conditioning and heat. Brick-veneer was added at a cost of \$35,000.

An organ and new chandeliers were purchased in 1986.

In 1987 a storage building was erected at the parsonage.

Pew cushions were installed in the sanctuary in February 1988.

In 1989 a harvest table, framed mirror, lamp, and candlesticks were placed in the annex by Margaret B. Doughtie in memory of her parents, David and Annie Floyed Braswell.

Plans are currently being formulated to install an audio system with funds

donated in memory of Mrs. Vada L. Strickland by her family.

Pleasant Grove has felt the decline experienced by all rural churches, but God has blessed it in many ways. We believe that it will continue to grow and be a strong church in the future.

ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The Associational Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the Annual Meeting in October 1996.

November 25, 1996

Moderator for the session was Gary McNair. Thirty-eight people representing

twenty churches were present.

WMU Leadership Team Director Kathy Braswell reported that thirty-seven women participated in a study of the book Five Steps to the Great Commission: A Study of the WMU Tasks, led by Elaine Lewis on October 29. The WMU sponsored a booth at the craft fair in Louisburg and raised approximately \$125.00 to go toward helping WMU Team members go on a mission trip to South Africa. Nanette Warren and Nancy Leonard led an Associational GA Foreign Mission Study on November 8. Thirty-one girls and leaders, representing four churches (Pilot, Sandy Creek, Ephesus, and Philadelphia) participated. Forty people attended the Associational Baptist Women's Day of Prayer held at Pine Ridge and led by Mildred Thompson. An offering of \$109.00 was received for the Women's Department of the Baptist World Alliance. Sixteen people gathered at Rocky Cross Baptist Church to pack Christmas boxes for the women at the Fountain Correctional Center in Rocky Mount on November 23. Ms. Braswell announced a brown bag luncheon to be held for WMU Leaders on February 15, at Philadelphia Baptist Church. The topic for discussion at this meeting is Project Help 1997 which focuses on Child Advocacy.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton announced that Baptist Men's Day is to be January 26, 1997. He encouraged churches to recognize the men and have something special for them. He also encouraged men and women to attend the North Carolina Baptist Missions Conference and Baptist Men's Convention to be held in

Greensboro on January 31-February 1.

Discipleship Supporter Jody Griffin reported that nine ministers had met monthly to study the book FaithOuakes. A successful Bible Drill Kickoff was held on October 7, at Spring Hope. A Discipleship Strategy Meeting will be held on January 21.

Bill Wallace, reporting for Music Council Director Nanette Warren, announced the Annual Christmas Caroling to be held on December 19. The carolers will meet at Winn Dixie in Louisburg, carol at the hospital and area resthomes, and then go to Louisburg Baptist Church for refreshments.

Treasurer Annette Coppedge presented the financial report for October. She expressed appreciation to the churches and individuals for their support of the Tar

River Baptist Association.

Luis Maravi, Pastor of Victory In Christ, the Hispanic Mission, reported that average attendance at the mission on Sundays is seventy, and on Wednesdays, fifty to fifty-five. He is currently leading a Bible Study of Baptist Doctrines. requested prayer for land needed by the mission.

Rev. Wallace added to Rev. Maravi's report that materials had been secured to repair the modular units at the mission. He announced that carpentry help is

needed.

Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report, gave an update on the progress of the new associational building. He announced the Christmas Banquet for Ministers and Mates to be held on December 6, at Pilot. He announced that the Louisburg Toy Store would be located in the west end of the Byrd's Food Store building. He concluded his report by announcing a mission trip being planned for South Africa during February 20 through March 6, 1997.

After prayer requests, the meeting adjourned with prayer by Ed Carroll.

March 24, 1997

Moderator for the session was Gary McNair. Thirty-seven people representing

sixteen churches were present.

WMU Director Kathy Braswell reported that the Associational WMU Leadership Team met January 12 with eight members present. Six church WMU groups were represented at the Brown Bag Lunch on Feb. 15 at Philadelphia Baptist Church. The National WMU is sponsoring a "Volunteer Connection" program. Applications are available from Ms. Braswell and training will be offered by the associational WMU. A Creative Ministries Workshop is scheduled for May 31, at Sandy Creek Baptist Church. Workshops in the areas of crafts, music, and drama will be offered. The WMU Annual Spring Meeting will be on April 7 at Sandy Creek Baptist Church. According to Ms. Braswell, Tar River was represented at the Missions Extravaganza at Ridgecrest, March 21-23, by approximately twenty-eight participants from eight churches. Project HELP: Child Advocacy Projects currently being done are tutoring, making prayer bears, and collecting items needed by Wake Medical Center. The Acteens will

have a Missions Fair on May 17, and plans are being formulated for an Acteen Designa-Flyer Contest. The first Acteen newsletter will be mailed in June.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton announced that attendance at the Baptist Men's Convention in January was the largest ever, and Tar River was represented. The Tar River Spring Golf Tournament will be held at The River Golf Course on April 10. The need has been realized and interest expressed in Tar River obtaining a Disaster Recovery Unit for use when a disaster occurs. A committee is presently gathering information.

Discipleship Supporter Jody Griffin reported 154 people, representing seventeen churches, were served a meal at the Deacon Renewal held at Rock Spring on March 6. The Associational Bible Drill will be held on April 6 at First Baptist Church Spring Hope. Drillers are from Oak Grove, Spring Hope, and Sandy Creek. Lynn Lloyd, wife of Rev. Paul Lloyd from Maple Springs, has joined the Discipleship Support Team.

Music Council Director Namette Warren announced that members of Tar River went Christmas caroling in the snow in December 1996. Music was provided at the Ministers' and Mates Christmas Banquet. Music is being planned for the Semi-Annual Meeting. A music school will be held on April 29.

Finance Committee Chairman Everette Mangum presented the financial report for February. He expressed appreciation to the churches and individuals for their contributions.

Georgette Guin presented the annual financial report for 1996.

Vice-moderator Adolphus Batchelor presented a recommendation from the Associational Council that the association accept the titles to the two modular units at Strickland's Crossroads offered by the NC Baptist State Convention. The vote carried. Victory in Christ will be asked to pay the insurance premiums on the units. The mission is accepting more of its operating expenses in an effort to

reach their goal of being a self-supporting church.

Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report, expressed a desire for the association to occupy the new building by this summer. Work has continued, but we have reached a point where more revenue must be generated before work can be completed. It is estimated that \$51,000 is needed to complete the building. the parking lot could be as much as an additional \$62,000. The Associational Council and the Finance Committee have been discussing ways to obtain the money needed. The possibility of having several barbecues in different locations would raise some needed funds. It has also been suggested that letters be written to individuals encouraging donations. Rev. Wallace stated that he thought the problem was not a lack of funds but a lack of faith. In the beginning it was estimated that the building would cost \$250,000. Thus far we have spent approximately \$170,000 on the building itself. If we all make a concerted prayer effort, we could soon complete the building.

Gary McNair emphasized that other ministries are needed to be done in the association. Doing ministry takes money. We can't do these needed ministries until

the building is finished.

Nan Jones suggested that an offering be taken at the Associational Semi-Annual Meeting for the new building. Rev. Wallace said that the building was so close to being finished. It would only take a little over \$1000 from each church. It was also suggested that the churches try to raise \$5 per member in an effort to complete the building.

Continuing his report, Bill Wallace announced that the mission trip to South Africa was a tremendous success. Jay Meadows, Phillip Rice, and Jimmy Layton from Duke Memorial Baptist Church installed a ceiling at the Atlantis Baptist Church. They also had the opportunity to preach, share testimonies, and lead week-night Bible Studies. Duane Caldwell, Bailey Baptist Church; David Averette, Franklinton Baptist Church; Tom Drupple, Ephesus Baptist Church, and Bill Wallace did door-todoor and street evangelism in three towns (Vredengurg, Saldahna, & Langebaan). They had the opportunity to share testimonies, do drama, and preach in a high school to approximately 1800 students. At the conclusion of these services eighty-five to ninety percent prayed to receive Christ. They ministered to 1200-1500 children in three primary schools with about half making decisions for Christ. They also shared at a Naval Academy where 175-200 recruits attended a church service and about fifteen responded. Any of the team members will be glad to visit the churches and share testimonies and slides. Another mission trip to South Africa is being considered for June.

Rev. Wallace reported that Mr. Carson Barnes has offered to donate an acre of land for a new church building for the Victory in Christ Hispanic Mission. The only stipulations are that the property must not be sold, and the denomination must not be changed.

Rev. Wallace closed his report by announcing that he began his eleventh year as Director of Mission on March 1, 1997. He will be sixty-five years old on May 6, but

has no present plans to retire.

After prayer requests and praise reports, the meeting adjourned with prayer by Shelby Stephens.



AFTERNOON SESSION

(Note: Some reports are not printed in the Proceedings, but are placed in this annual following the Proceedings.)

1. The 167th Fall Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 pm by Moderator Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church.

Mr. Lloyd West, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, led in singing the opening hymn, "To God be the Glory."

3. Rev. McNair expressed appreciation to the four host churches.

4. Rev. Norris Cook, Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.

5. Rev. McNair organized the session, and appointed Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock Baptist Church, as parliamentarian.

- 6. Mr. Adolphus Batchelor, Holly Grove Baptist Church, presented the report of the program committee and made a motion that it be adopted with the following change: an offering will be taken for the associational building fund in the afternoon and evening session. The vote carried.
 7. Rev. Bill Wallace, Director of Missions for Tar River Baptist Association,
- recognized Rev. Stephen Moore, new pastor at White Level Baptist Church.
- 8. Ms. Georgette Guin, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, recognized the twenty-two honor clerks. Rev. Wallace presented the honor clerks with a certificate.
- 9. The histories of the host churches were presented by Mrs. Melba Perry, Hopkins Chapel and Mrs. Carolyn Smith, Corinth. No one was present to present histories for Hickory Rock and Union Hope.

10. Mr. West led in singing the hymn, "Rescue the Perishing."

- After an introduction by Rev. Wallace, Rev. Talmadge Williams presented the Annuity Board Report. He suggested the church members give to the Cooperative Program, get involved in the "Adopt-An-Annuitant" Program, volunteer time to encourage churches to help retired people, and be sure their own minister and church staff were participating in the annuity program with a sufficient amount to retire in dignity. 12. Ms. Georgette Guin, secretary of the Tar River Baptist Association, presented the
- Historian's Report, and requested prayer for Miss Irma Gupton member of Mount Zion Baptist Church and historian for the association. Miss Gupton was in the hospital in critical condition. 13. Mr. Gerald Nelms, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, presented the Nominating Committee

Report as printed, and made a motion that the report be adopted. The vote carried. 14. Rev. McNair led an installation service for the officers and leaders of the

association for the 1997-98 year.

15. Rev. Ed Carroll, Peachtree Baptist Church, led in singing the hymn, " I Love to Tell the Story."

16. Mrs. Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the financial report for September 1997. She also presented the proposed budget for 1998, and made a motion that it be adopted. The vote carried.

- Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, "Send Me, O Lord, Send Me."
 Rev. McNair led the offertory prayer. While an offering for the associational building fund was being received, Mrs. Wallace and Miss Warren provided background music.
- 19. Rev. McNair expressed appreciation to the accompanists for the session, Mrs. Joann Wallace, and Miss Nanette Warren, both from Pilot Baptist Church.

20. Mr. Jonathan Matthews, South Africa, provided background music while Rev. Wallace led the memorial service.

21. Mr. Jonathan Matthews, South Africa Coordinator for the North Carolina/South Africa Partnership, expressed greetings from South Africa. He said he hoped that through the partnership the churches that had been planted would begin to develop. teams from Tar River have been to South Africa. He said South Africa plans to send teams to North Carolina. He expressed appreciation from the Western Province Baptist Association for love and support given.

- 22. Rev. Wallace introduced Grady Faulk, Pastor, Stowe Memorial Baptist Church in Pineville, NC.
- 23. Jonathan and Faith Matthews and Rev. Angelo Scheepers, South Africa, presented special music.

24. Rev. Grady Faulk brought the afternoon message.

25. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Dr. C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church.

EVENING SESSION

- 1. After special music by the Ephesus Children's Choir, Moderator Gary McNair called the meeting to order.
 - 2. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn, "Victory in Jesus."
 - 3. Rev. Mark Palmer, Union Hope Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
- 4. Rev. McNair led the offertory prayer. While an offering for the associational building fund was being received, Miss Nanette Warren, pianist and fluteist Kim Massey, Rocky Cross Baptist Church, provided background music.
- 5. Mr. Wayne Gupton, Red Bud Baptist Church, presented the report for the Brotherhood and Royal Ambassadors.
- 6. Mrs. Wendy Edwards, First Baptist Church, Spring Hope, and Rev. Carl Poole, Rock Spring Baptist Church, presented the Discipleship Report which was a dramatic presentation emphasizing the importance of exercising the soul with a daily walk with God. Key chains with shoes and shoe shaped erasers were distributed as reminders.
- 7. Miss Namette Warren, Pilot Baptist Church, presented the music report. She added an announcement about a children's musical to be offered in 1998. She also emphasized that children were learning to play instruments in the schools, and that the churches should be implementing these skills in their services.
- 8. Rev. David Brooks, Centerville Baptist Church, presented the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee Report. He made a motion that the recommendation be adopted as printed. The vote carried.
- 9. Mrs. Jenny Alford, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the Vacation Bible School report. She added that VBS makes a difference in the lives of children and parents. We need to get children excited about God's word. Next year's theme will be centered around outer space.
- 10. Ms. Kathy Freeman, Philadelphia Baptist Church, presented the report of the Woman's Missionary Union. She announced that at the Baptist Women's Day of Prayer on November 2, Mildred Thompson, Flat Rock Baptist Church, and Nanette Warren, Pilot Baptist Church, will lead studies on peace. Debbie Johnson, Rocky Cross Baptist Church will provide special music. The International Mission Study entitled "A Heart for the Hungry" will be on November 17, led by Beverly Wheeler and the Acteens of Wood Baptist Church. On December 5 volunteers will meet at Rocky Cross Baptist Church to pack gift boxes and fruit bags for the women at the Fountain Correctional Center in Rocky Mount. Each WMU is asked to give \$80 towards the gift boxes and fruit. She concluded her report by introducing the members of the WMU Leadership Team.
- 11. Rev. Wallace called attention to the printed report of the Director of Missions and added that it was a joy to serve the Tar River Association. He introduced Luis Maravi, Dan Bland, and Charlie Morgan.
- 12. Rev. Luis Maravi, Pastor of the Victory in Christ Hispanic Mission, reported that attendance at the mission was good. He added to the printed report that the mission is striving to be self-supporting. He expressed appreciation for prayers and support. 13. Mr. Dan Bland, Lake Royale Christian Ministries, presented the mission report for Lake Royale Christian Ministries.
- 14. Rev. Charlie Morgan, Pastor of the Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship, reported that the mission had a high attendance of thirty-four, with an average of twenty-four. He announced that Mr. Adolphus Batchelor would be the cook for the Toy Run and Pig-Pickin. He emphasized that Damascus Road is a mission in not of the Tar River Baptist Association (they are self supporting with help from the NC Baptist State Convention.) 15. Rev. Wallace, concluding his report, emphasized that there are many ministry opportunities available. Tar River Baptist Association does not exist to do missions for any church, but to encourage and enable each church and member to be on mission. He emphasized that God has a mission for each person. The Associational Finance Committee distributed envelopes containing five dollar bills. Rev. Wallace asked the question, "What'cha gonna with what'cha got?" He said to take the money and use it for a good cause in the name of Jesus. He closed by saying, "Find Your Place In Missions."

16. Mr. and Mrs. Terry and Jenny Alford, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented special

music.

- 17. After an introduction by Rev. Wallace, Rev. Angelo Scheepers, Director of Missions, Western Province Baptist Association, South Africa, brought the evening message.
- 18. Special music was provided by a Ladies' Ensemble.

19. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reporting for the Credential Committee, said that attendance at the Fall Annual Meeting for 1997 was as follows: 98 messengers, 12 alternate messengers, 26 pastors, 12 associational officers, 47 guests (for a total of 195 people) representing thirty-six churches and three missions. 20. The Resolutions Committee Report, given by Rev. Tom Eldridge, Bunn Baptist Church, was as follows:

Whereas the Reverend Gary McNair has faithfully served as Moderator of our Association for a period of two years, and whereas he has presided with godliness, dignity and expertise, and

Whereas he has been dependable, presiding at Association semi-annual meetings and board meetings,

Be it therefore resolved that we express to the Reverend McNair our love with genuine gratitude for the leadership, stability, and consistency he has provided throughout his term of service.

Resolution 3:

Whereas Mr. Adolphus Batchelor has responsibly served as Vice Moderator for a period of two years, and

Whereas he will assume the position of Moderator at the end of this meeting, Be it therefore resolved that we make plain our appreciation for his past service,

Be it finally resolved that we strive to support him as he serves our Association of Churches as Moderator in the future. Resolution 4:

Whereas the Reverend Bill Wallace has served the Tar River Baptist Association with vision, commitment, energy, and with unselfish sacrifice, and

Whereas his love for God Almighty and our Savior Jesus Christ is evident in his words, actions and demeanor, and

Whereas he has encouraged us to be on mission, and

Whereas he has shown his love for each Association church, church member and pastor,

Whereas his efforts to see our Association building completed have been tireless, Be it therefore resolved that we express to the Reverend Wallace our deep love and

Be it finally resolved that we commit to pray for his ministry to the glory of God. Resolution 5:

Whereas Ms. Georgette Guin faithfully serves as our Association Secretary and Clerk with loyalty, devotion and patience, and

Whereas she daily assists churches and individuals exhibiting love for them and love for Christ,

Be it therefore resolved that we express our love and appreciation to Ms. Guin for the sweet spirit with which she serves and her contribution to God 's work in our community.

Rev. Eldridge made a motion that these resolutions be adopted. The vote carried. 21. Rev. McNair, after closing comments, passed the gavel to the new moderator, Mr. Adolphus Batchelor. Mr. Batchelor accepted the gavel of responsibility, and adjourned the meeting with prayer.

HISTORY OF HOPKINS CHAPEL BAPTIST CHURCH

Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church, Inc. is located in Little River Township, Wake County, six miles north of Zebulon, NC. It was founded out of the community's deep need for a more spiritual acknowledgement of its devotion to God. What began as local prayer meetings became an organized church of eleven members on September 25, 1851. Hopkins Chapel was named in honor of Joseph F. Hopkins, a charter member and the first clerk.

In 1852 Hopkins Chapel was admitted into the Central Association, with a

membership of fourteen and fifty cents in the treasury.

During it's 146 year history, the church has been served by twenty-three pastors: M. Williams, M. Freeman, W. Nowell, A. Purefort, J. Booth, G. Coppedge, A. Pippin, A. Setzer, C. Williams, J. Mitchiner, Raleigh Sherron, L. Evans, A. Parrish, Jimmy Atkins, Henry Morgan, Fred Crisp, Johnny Caldwell, Virgil McBride, Edward Lehman, Claude Walker, Jim Tate, WC Barham, MW Shaw, and our present pastor, Rev. Norris Cook who has been our pastor for fourteen years.

The church's first revival, held at about the time of the Civil War with Rev. Freeman, brought the church thirty-two new members. Three of them were black. Another revival, conducted by Rev. Parrish, brought 126 new members. In the 1930's under Rev. Evans, forty members were added in one year - thirty-six of them by baptism. Hopkins

Chapel presently has 451 members.

The first building, a one room log structure, stood on the site that is now the

cemetery. During revivals, brush arbors were constructed to expand seating.

In 1888 a new white framed building with greater seating capacity was erected. This was added on to several times to accommodate congregational growth. This new building was truly a venture in faith. When the church was struggling to pay off its debt, God came to its aid in the person of B.L. Strickland, who took over the note, giving the church extra time to meet its obligations. God intervened again when, on October 27, 1893, Hopkins Chapel was advertised for sale because of inability to liquidate debts. God's movement on the hearts of the community brought the generous response that paid the church's debt.

Forward-looking and progressive-minded since its inception, Hopkins Chapel erected

yet another building in 1957.

In the early 1970's Hopkins Chapel decided to leave the Raleigh Association and unite with the Tar River Association. As hoped, this change has made possible greater progress and ministry to the glory of God. To enhance community ministry a church secretary was hired in September of 1973.

Because of a couple of break-ins, we installed a burglar alarm system in our

church in 1980.

On December 4, 1994 we voted to build a Fellowship Building. 1.15 acres of land was donated in memory of Robert and Olivia Perry by their children, Linwood, Elmer, James, Norman, and Donnie Perry. A 3200 Square Foot building would be built at a quote price of \$179,500. This building was dedicated on October 6, 1996 and we had our first Homecoming lunch there. The new fellowship building debt was paid off in May 1997.

Through the years many dedicated Christians have made possible the wonderful happenings at Hopkins Chapel. We are confident that each of these will be duly noted and rewarded when we stand before the Master. We are rightfully proud of our heritage, but like our founders we cannot be satisfied unless every effort has been exhausted to reach the lost. Though thankful for our material blessings, our greatest joy is seeing souls coming to Christ and serving the Master in their giving of money, time, and talent.

HISTORY OF CORINTH BAPTIST CHURCH

The history of Corinth dates back to 1785, but the congregation has changed names and locations several times. In 1785 the church was known as Toole's Meeting House. Sometime later the name was changed to Crocker's Chapel. When the congregation moved to a location between Rocky Ford and Ingleside, the name became Haywood Meeting House, and later named Haywood Baptist Church.

Following the Civil War, Brother Peter Dement gave the land for the present site. The old Haywood church property was sold to the black Baptists in the community.

Several buildings have been erected on the present church property. The name Corinth was chosen when the congregation moved into the first building on this site. A larger frame building, constructed in 1911 or 1912, was destroyed by fire in 1925. Thus the present building was erected.

Many improvements have been made over the years. Following World War II, under the leadership of Rev. Jack Wilder, a central heating system was installed. A unified church budget was also adopted. During the ministry of Rev. Gilbert Mister, the Sunday School annex on the left side of the sanctuary was built and paid for, and a Hammond organ was purchased. In 1963 Mr. George Fuller gave a plot of land in the Moulton community and the present parsonage was built. The first family to live in the parsonage was that of Rev. Billy Martin. On January 3, 1965, he led in the noteburning for the \$15,000 parsonage, leaving the church debt free. In October 1973 a new educational building was built on the right of the sanctuary. It consisted of four Sunday School rooms, a bathroom, and a basement kitchen. This was done under the leadership of Rev. Mackie Bozen. In 1979 Betty Campbell was hired as the first minister of youth and music. She served until 1981. From 1982-84 Nathan Ferrell served in this position. In 1982 through the will of Mr. Lonnie Inscoe, a long-time member and leader in the church; the church became owner of a house which was used as the home of the minister of youth and music. Pew cushions, installed in 1982, were mainly paid for by memorial contributions for George Fuller, a member, deacon, and Sunday School teacher.

In 1986-87 a new fellowship area and educational wing was constructed and in 1988-89 Sunday School rooms were renovated. That year we provided a tape ministry for

In 1989-90 Rev. Don Dowless began a new singles and young couples Sunday School class in memory of Rodney Smith.
In 1991-92 Sunday School attendance increased, renovations were made, and a

baptistery was installed.

In 1992-93 we made a sizable contribution to the relief fund for victims of Hurricane Andrew. We also made donations to Southeastern Seminary, and Epsom and Louisburg Rescue Services.

In 1993-94 we sent our pastor to Romania on a mission trip and to the Southern

Baptist Convention in Florida.

In 1994-95 improvements were made to the church cemetery and outdoor playground

equipment was purchased. In 1996-97 we started a mission fund to send church members to help on the mission

field. Pastor Don Dowless resigned, and we are currently looking for a new pastor. Ties with the Tar River Association go back many years. In 1849 and 1871, the annual meeting was held with the Haywood Baptist Church. The first meeting with Corinth was in 1901. In 1936 the association again met at Corinth and Rev. John Edwards, having been ordained by Corinth, preached the associational sermon. In the fall of 1965, the 135th annual session of the Tar River Baptist Association met at Corinth with Mountain Grove as co-host. In 1984 Corinth and Hickory Rock were cohosts.

Corinth can be proud of their history and can truly say "To God be the Glory".

HISTORY OF HICKORY ROCK BAPTIST CHURCH

On August 1, 1915 a meeting was held at Hickory Rock Academy for the purpose of organizing a missionary Baptist Church. Rev. George Duke presided over the meeting; Mr. G.B. West acted as clerk; and Rev. J.H. Harper, as reading clerk. Church services were held in the Hickory Rock Academy until a new building could be constructed. Rev. George Duke was called as the first pastor.

In the fall of 1915 a new building was begun. Under the leadership of Mr. W.J. Dennis, Mr. R.D. Williams, Mr. E.H. Gupton, and great cooperation from the seventeen

charter members, the building was completed in the spring of 1916.

Many additions and changes have come about during the years as various pastors have led us. Under the leadership of Rev. John Edwards, the church added a new wing for Sunday School rooms. During the next few years, under the leadership of Pastor Jack Roe, the church made plans for renovations and carried out these plans during the time Rev. Wiley Guthrie was pastor. Six Sunday School rooms were added, and the church was bricked. A heating plant was installed, and an organ purchased. Soon afterward a new piano was added, the sanctuary received new carpet, and a front porch was built. In the fall of 1962, with Rev. Henry C. Green Jr. serving a pastor, groundbreaking for a new educational building took place. This building became a reality the next year. During the fall of 1966, a new heating and air conditioning plant was installed in the church sanctuary. In 1969 the church built a parsonage, which was first occupied by Rev. Clay Cook and his family. We continued to make progress under the leadership of Rev. Jimmy Harrington. Under the leadership of Rev. Jack Sammons, central air conditioning was installed in both the parsonage and educational building. In 1976 the

church constructed a fellowship building. In 1979, with the Rev. Jerry Bryant as pastor, the church started a puppet ministry. The church presented the pastor and his family a permanent membership to Town and Country Recreation Center through a memorial fund in memory of Mrs. Lula Smith. In 1980, new lighting was installed in the church in memory of Mr. Horace Duke. Rev. Everett L. Rumley, Jr. was called as pastor in 1981. The church cushioned the pews of the sanctuary, covered the floor in the fellowship building, and recovered the roof over the educational building in 1982. church added a circular paved drive in memory of Mr. Kirby Parrish in 1983. From 1984 to 1990 the church experienced a number of changes under the direction of Pastor Rick Cato and Dr. Don Godfrey. In the late 80's, a steeple and a baptistery were added to the sanctuary facility. The church adopted a two-year growth plan in 1989 anticipating the future. In June of 1991 Hickory Rock called Rev. Rick Wade as pastor.

All of the aforementioned pastors were students at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, but due to theological differences with that school's changing philosophy concerning the role of women in the church, Hickory Rock decided that the time had come to look elsewhere for prospective pastors. As a result, the church turned to the Baptist House of Studies at Duke Divinity School for help and consequently called the Rev. Tim Cannon as pastor in February of 1994. He is the youngest pastor in the history of the church and the first to attend a non-SBC seminary. Under his leadership, the church has continued its long-standing history of

gender inclusivity by ordaining God-called women to the diaconate ministry.

God has richly blessed the people and pastors of Hickory Rock through the years. The people have maintained a vital ministry to student pastors, cultivated warm fellowship, and continued to seek Christian growth in terms of quality and quantity. Respectfully submitted, Tim Cannon, Pastor

HISTORY OF UNION HOPE BAPTIST CHURCH

Prior to the organization of Union Hope Baptist Church in 1936, the old Union Hope School building was the hub of the community as children learned to read and write during the week and about spiritual matters on Sunday. For the price of \$75, the Union Hope Schoolhouse was purchased from Nash County in 1936 by members of the community to officially establish a church. In August 1936 twenty-six charter members enrolled and offered themselves for membership by letter or signature. The first baptismal service was held at Driver's Pond on March 21, 1937 with a total of twenty-seven persons being baptized and received into the church. From it's beginning until 1948 the church held meetings once a month, and then the church voted to extend the services to twice each month. By 1949 the church had grown from twenty-six charter members to 186 members. On October 6, 1949 tragedy struck the church when six of its young people perished in a school bus accident and many others were injured.

In 1958 under the leadership of Rev. Carroll Veatch the church moved forward and

constructed an Educational Building behind the old sanctuary.

In 1971 the old frame church was taken down to make way for a new sanctuary. While the new sanctuary was being built, the church held its worship services in the basement of the educational building. It was during this time, despite the crowded conditions, that some of the best services were held. The construction of the new building started in December 1971 and was completed in May 1972. Mrs. Jennifer Brantley (formerly Ginger Thompson) painted the baptistery scene and presented it to the church. The church held its first services in the new sanctuary on Mother's Day, May 14, 1972.

Three young men from Union Hope Baptist Church have been licensed and ordained into the gospel ministry. They are Leroy Trevathan (1954), Jackie Bryant (1963), and

Patrick Corbett (1968).

In 1974 the new basement was completed and was named the James R. Tant Fellowship Hall in honor of Captain Jimmy Tant, one of the young men from the community that lost his life in a plane crash in Bolivia in August 1974.

The church built an addition to the parsonage in 1979 (two bedrooms, bath and study) with other minor renovations to the existing kitchen and living room.

A \$50,000 renovation and expansion was made to the church in 1988-89 and a

dedication service was held in August 1989.

In September 1994 the church parking lot and driveway was paved at a cost of \$20,000. It was during the annual business meeting in September 1994 that Ellen Williams was voted as Sunday School Superintendent. This was the first time in the history of Union Hope that a woman was voted into this position.

The present pastor, Rev. Mark Palmer, his wife Joanna and daughter Rachel began their ministry at Union Hope on the first Sunday in October 1996.

During 1997 the church organized an active prayer group and outreach mission group. The church voted to renovate/redecorate the sanctuary. Through diligent work of the renovation committee, the installation of new windows, chandeliers, carpet; reupholstery of the pews; and purchase of a new sound system was completed prior to the fall homecoming service.

God continues to bless this farming community, and we give Him the praise and

glory for all things.

The following men have served as pastors of Union Hope: Theo Davis, 1936-1940; J.N. Stancil, 1941-1951; Dale Davis, 1951-1954; Roy J. Smith, 1954-1957; Groce Robinson, 1957-1958; Carroll Veatch, 1958-1962; Walter H. Mayes, 1962-1964; Joe W. Chandler, 1964-1968; Kenneth Childers, 1968-1971; Steward Smith, 1971-1971; Larry Vickery, 1971-1974; Rex Bell, 1974-1975; Gary Rickman, 1978-1981; Frank Hollifield, 1982-1987; Mark Tilley, 1988-1996; and Mark Palmer, 1996-present.

BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL/ROYAL AMBASSADORS REPORT

DISCIPLESHIP REPORT Are You A Discipler?

Roy Edgemon, Discipleship Director of the Baptist Sunday School Board, says, "The word disciple occurs 269 times in the New Testament. In Comparison, the word Christian is found three times, and was used to distinguish the disciples from a sect of Jews (Acts 11:26). The New Testament is a book about disciples, written by disciples, and for the growing of disciples. The Greek word for disciple is mathetes, and is used in four different applications:

- to refer to a committed follower of any teacher or group, such as Moses' disciples (John 9:28), the Pharisees' disciples (Matt. 22:15-16), or John's

disciples (Matt. 9:14).

- to refer to the twelve women Jesus trained and sent out in His name (Mark 3:14-19). - to describe those who give God priority over every human relationship (Luke 14:26), over all of Life's goals (Luke 14:27), and over all material possessions (Luke 14:33).

- to describe persons who love one another (John 13:34-35), bear fruit (John 15:8), and live in God's Word (John 8:31).

A disciple of Jesus makes a lifelong commitment to the person, teaching, and Spirit of Jesus Christ. Life under Jesus' lordship involves progressive learning, growth in Christlikeness, application of biblical truth, and responsible church membership. More simply put, it is to make Christ, Lord of one's life . . .

By not offering continual opportunities for growth in discipleship, some churches seem to imply that discipleship is optional. I fear we are also saying that servanthood is optional. The first imperative of the Great Commission is to make disciples, then baptize and teach them in all things that Jesus commanded. Eighty times in the gospels Jesus said, 'follow Me.' I fear today that our churches are filled with people who have not decided to follow Jesus."

Won't you decide today to follow Jesus and become a growing disciple? Won't you commit to become an intentional discipler of others for the Lord Jesus Christ in the Tar River Association? Call any of the Associational Discipleship Supporters for

assistance in becoming a disciple and a discipler of others!

This has been a very good year for discipleship in the Tar River Association. While we deeply regret losing Rickey Letson, who moved to the Greensboro area, we have been delighted to add Mrs. Lynn Lloyd, Maple Springs Baptist Church, as a new Associational Discipleship Supporter. She will focus on the spiritual maturity of women.

We conducted one Strategy Meeting at which we had very good participation and good ideas generated. A tremendously successful Bible Drill Kickoff was conducted last fall to introduce the 1997 Drill material. The Drills themselves were held in April. MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL REPORT

A Media Library Conference was held on August 18 with seven in attendance. The conference opened with a welcome and opening prayer from Rev. Jay Meadows, pastor of Duke Memorial Baptist Church. After brief introductions, each member of the class was encouraged to share their experiences with Media Library Ministry. The class shared a diverse background which included experiences from large city churches to smaller rural churches.

The opening question was: "When we think of libraries, what comes to mind?" After a brief discussion a second question was asked: "When we think of church libraries, what comes to mind?" Our conclusions were: libraries are "outlets of information," and church libraries are information outlets with a certain task in mind, a specific mission: namely, to communicate the knowledge of how to accept Christ and how to grow in Christ. Media Library is first and foremost a ministry of the local church.

Several questions were posed to help us get at the heart of Media Library Ministry:

What's the message which needs to be proclaimed?

The message which needs to be proclaimed through Media Library Ministry is the "good news" of Jesus Christ. God's love and grace extends to all people regardless of situation or circumstance. God's love is best seen through an intimate and personal relationship with Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord of our lives. The good news for everyone in our church and community is that God's love is for them.

To whom can we proclaim the message? (Or who are our library patrons?) Prospective users of our library and prospective people to whom we can minister are quite diverse. There are youth, children, younger and older adults. There are teachers, students, new members, deacons, even the pastor. People with specific needs are new Christians, dating couples, newly wed couples, and senior citizens. Encouragement to parents at various stages can be a ministry - parents with newborns, parents with young children, parents dealing with teens, and "grand" parents relating to their "grand" kids. Conceivably everyone within a church or community can be ministered to through the church's media library ministry.

What topics can be addressed?


People have a variety of life experiences, and the church's media library ministry can offer resources in various areas: grief, loss, and death; raising children; money management and stewardship; home schooling; marriage enrichment; seasonal celebrations; prayer; seeking to understand the character of God; missions; literacy or tutoring; group recreations; witnessing; addictions; crafts and hobbies; wellness; devotions; music; and worship.


How do we proclaim our message?

Many resources can be used to proclaim the message: books (fiction and non-fiction), movies, videos, maps, projectors, commentaries, computers, software, VCR, TV, CD, cassettes, magazines, newsletters, and study courses.

After understanding the what we are doing, to whom we are doing, and how we should do it, we need to develop a clear Mission Statement for our library which tells WHO does WHAT, for WHOM and WHY. Because all libraries can't be all things to all people, mission statements help local libraries focus their attention and resources into a specific direction. A sample mission statement follows: The membership of First Baptist seeks to minister and equip the children and laity of our church in order to nurture and develop lives which are Christ-centered; so that God might be glorified and the good news of Christ proclaimed.

Rememer two important footnotes concerning a mission statement. First, the statement needs to be prominently displayed within the library. Secondly, every mission statement needs to be periodically evaluated to determine if a revision of purpose is in order. As the life of a church changes, so do ministry needs.





The Specific Tasks of Media Library were reviewed: 1) to provide media which includes selection, processing, pre-mending, repairing, and circulating; 2) to promote media which includes visual, written, spoken, and planned activities; 3) to train persons in the use of media which includes learning to use a book correctly, use of library, and use of equipment.

Our discussion ended with the LIMITS of a church library - time, space, and budget. If time is a problem, share the load with others and offer the library at key times. If space is a problem, choose a central and accessible location, start small and look to grow. If budget is a problem, be specific about needs, educate people about costs (10 children videos at \$14 each requires \$140), offer a budget committee more than one option (three is good: a need list, like list, and wish list), enlist support of those who have benefitted, and be vocal about activities of the library.

This concluded our Media Conference during the Key Leadership Conference of the

Tar River Baptist Association.

We have come together as sisters in Christ to accomplish much in a world and community that needs much. I would personally like to thank each WMU member for the support they have given to WMU.

The WMU Leadership Team is made up of ten members that meet on a quarterly basis and receive training from the State WMU. These women offer their services to our church WMU's through training, studies, and encouragement.

During the 1996-97 year many events were planned, attended, and participated in by the Leadership Team and members throughout the association. MISSION REPORT: DAMASCUS ROAD BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP

September 1996 found the church still meeting in the home of our Pastor, Rev. Charlie Morgan. In early October, we rented an abandoned Methodist Church building in Stanhope. Our dedication service was planned for Nov. 30, so that we could begin worship service on December 1st. We were members of the Raleigh Association at this time, but the building was outside their territory, so we applied for membership in the Tar River Association and we became a mission of this association.

It is amazing to watch God work in this place. There were broken windows to be repaired, but that kind of glass was no longer made. Then we found an old window in a corner with enough good glass in it to fix all the broken ones. Four days after praying and asking God for much needed pulpit and altar furniture, it was delivered. Tables and chairs that we needed were supplied that month. Needed hymnals came almost immediately. Repairs to the furnace and the water system were necessary. These were taken care of by the same man at an extremely reasonable cost. The building needed a coat of paint to brighten it up, and the manpower to do this was supplied by volunteers. During all the repair work on the building, we had a Baptism Service for three! Praise the Lord!

On Saturday, November 30, 1996 at 2:00 pm, Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship held its Dedication service in the "new" facility. Sixteen attended. On Sunday, Dec. 1, seventeen attended the first worship service. Since that time, we have had seven saved, and our worship attendance is averaging twenty. We have had a wedding and a funeral. We have seen the miracles of alcoholics overcoming their addiction and substance abusers being freed.

Over the period of the last year, we have received a piano, an organ, a desk for the office, enough chairs to equip a Sunday School room, all the necessary items for a nursery, a copier, a sound system, and a beautiful hand painted sign for cutside. We prayed for someone to lead music in our Worship service, and the Lord sent us Mrs. SooYing Heskett. Pastor Charlie participated in the leadership seminar of the NAMB, "Basic Training for Church Planters" in Denver, Colorado in July. Wakefield Baptist in Zebulon built and carpeted a new altar, and Mt. Moriah Baptist in Cary sent out a crew to do woodwork repair and painting. I am just awed at the power of God to do what needs to be done.

In September 1997, Flat Rock Baptist Church voted to become our membership support church. This allows us to house our membership in a fully constituted church. As members of Flat Rock Baptist Church we may be elected as messengers to the Association, the NC Baptist State Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention. Flat Rock donated their used church van to the mission, and we plan to use it to begin a youth ministry. We have recently appointed a Church Clerk, Ms. Effie Bevier, and a new Treasurer, Mr. John Mark Heskett. We began a Sunday School on Sunday, September 21, 1997. Also in this period, we collected a large quantity of clothing, and about twelve cases of canned goods for distribution by the Raleigh Rescue Mission. We are planning a Baptism Service in October for three and a Biker's Toy Run on November 1, 1997 to help supply the Associational toy store.

As pastor, my vision for Damascus Road has not changed: to become a center for people in need, no matter what the need, that they may find all their needs fulfilled through the bounty of our Lord Jesus Christ. We have had just a small taste of that in this last year, and look forward to God continuing to bless us. We have set a goal of 100 in worship by Christmas '97. Only through the grace of God, prayer, and sharing our faith will this happen. Join with us in this prayer effort.

MISSION REPORT: HISPANIC/FRANKLINTON

After much prayer and discussion the Franklinton Baptist Church, in cooperation with the Tar River Baptist Association and the NC Baptist State Convention, decided to sponsor a Hispanic Mission. To initiate the Hispanic services a Fiesta was held on April 26, 1997 at Franklin Veneers. This event was promoted for two weeks prior. Rev. Luis Maravi and a group from Victory in Christ Hispanic Mission provided special music for the Fiesta. Six people attended the first service which was held on April 27, 1997. The group meets every Sunday in the fellowship hall of the Franklinton Baptist Church. From 3:00 pm until 5:00 pm they enjoy Bible study, worship and fellowship. From 5:00 pm until 6:00 pm two English classes, beginners and advanced, are taught by members of the Franklinton Church. Attendance fluctuates between two and eighteen people.

Recently two socials/fellowships were held. At the August 23 event sixteen were present, and on September 27 twenty-one attended. These socials were helpful in creating interest in the Bible Study for those who had not been attending, and in building unity within the group that has been attending.

The mission is currently studying the Gospel of John. Six members of the group

have learned the books of the New Testament.

MISSION REPORT: HISPANIC/VICTORY IN CHRIST

God is always great to his people, and we thank Him for being so to our mission. During the year we had eleven baptisms. Our attendance for the past period has increased to seventy-five in Sunday School and ninety-five during worship services. This has necessitated new divisions in our Sunday School classes. The classes are as follows: Birth to 5 years old, 6-8, 9-11, 12-14, 15-20, 21-30, and 30 up. This situation has granted the blessing of having more people involved as teachers and helpers.

The work at the mission continues being two-pronged because we have the migrant ministry with the seasonal workers and also the strengthening of the regular membership. Our guest speakers for the event were: Brother John Jones from the State Convention, Rev. Gilberto Barboza from the Hispanic Mission at Wilson, and Rev. Richard Contreras from San Antonio, Texas.

Since we have been experiencing such great attendance we are now praying to the Lord that He will give us a piece of land where we can build a temple. There is the possibility that Mr. Carson Barnes, owner of lots of agriculture land, may donate some for our purpose.

TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER COMMITTEE REPORT

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the Semi-Annual Meeting in April 1997. Both meetings were held at Duke Memorial Baptist Church.

June 23, 1997

Vice-moderator Adolphus Batchelor called the meeting to order. Following a devotion by Gordon Joyner, Moderator for the remainder of the session was Gary McNair. Thirty-one people were present, representing seventeen churches. C. Ray Pruette was appointed as Parliamentarian.

Ed Carroll made a motion that the missions of the association be added to the roll

call. The motion was seconded by Kathy Freeman, and the vote carried.

WMU Director Kathy Freeman reported that ninety-eight people attended the Annual WMU Spring Meeting on April 7. Thirty-eight people attended the Creative Ministries Workshop on May 31. The following workshops were offered: clowning, Bible school crafts, crafts for shut-in/nursing home ministry, child advocacy/cultural diversity projects, and sharing Jesus with children. Both events were held at Sandy Creek Baptist Church. Ms. Freeman attended a State Missions advocate training session on June 9. She announced an event for Mission Friends and Preschoolers to be held at Rocky Cross on August 10. Six members of the Associational WMU Leadership team will attend training at Caraway on July 11-12. The WMU Fall Celebration and Workshop will be held September 9 at Pearce Baptist Church.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton reported that he also went to the Regional Workshop for Advocates for State Missions. He explained that the total budget for the State WMU and Baptist Men comes from the State Missions Offering. He

encouraged promotion of this offering in the churches.

Discipleship Supporter Jody Griffin reported that a Discipleship Strategy Meeting was held on May 20 at Golden Corral. Twelve drillers, representing three churches, participated in the Associational Bible Drill in April. All the children qualified to go to the state drills. No youth from the Tar River Association participanted in the speakers' tournament, but there was one youth speaker from the Raleigh Association. The seventeen churches that attended the Deacon Renewal Service in March received a book entitled Time for a Check-up. Members of the Discipleship Support Team will attend the Discipleship Update at Caraway on August 22-23. The 1998 Bible Drill Kick-off is scheduled for September 16.

Bill Wallace, reporting for Evangelism Council Director DuPre Sanders, announced the Youth Cook-out and WITNESS Concert to be held on August 1 at Franklinton Baptist

Church and Franklinton High School respectfully.

Finance Committee Chairman Everette Mangum presented the financial report for May. Pastor Charlie Morgan of the Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship reported that repairs and remodeling work was being done at the mission. Some of the work was done by Wakefield Central Baptist Church in Zebulon. The mission has services every Sunday afternoon at 2 pm with an average attendance of seventeen. Guitar music is provided by Soo Ying Heskett. This motorcycle mission is located in the old Stanhope Methodist Church building on Highway 97. Four people have been saved this year. The mission has a food pantry and a clothing closet.

Rev. Wallace reported on the Hispanic Ministry at Franklinton Baptist Church. The pastor for the Hispanic Ministry is Grady Nowell, a retired missionary. He conducts Hispanic services with about seven - eight in attendance. He also conducts Bible Study

in a home.

Rev. Wallace read a report sent by Luis Maravi, Pastor of the Victory in Christ Hispanic Mission. The average attendance is eighty-eight. One hundred, two attended on June 8. On June 15 eighty-five were in Sunday School and 112 in the worship service. Since the beginning of the year, nine have received Jesus as their Savior and seven have been baptized. Discipleship training has started for new believers. In May, fourteen attended a Bible Study on Ephesians. After six years in the USA, Luis and Orfe Maravi visited their homein Peru. Upon returning from their trip, they continued their ministry by visiting migrant camps, distributing health kits and clothes, visiting people in jail, counseling, and translating in different places. The mission is growing and needs a bigger place to meet. An Anniversary Revival was held June 19-22 with attendance as follows: 93 on Thursday, 112 on Friday, 111 on Saturday, and 163 on Sunday. During the revival, seventeen received Jesus, and thirty-one made a reconciliation with the Lord. The revival concluded with a meal on Sunday.

Vice-moderator Adolphus Batchelor presented a motion from the associational council that Bill Wallace's salary package be adjusted by increasing his housing allowance and decreasing his salary, in order that his salary would not exceed what he is allowed to earn without penalty by the Internal Revenue Service. The vote carried.

Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report, announced that cabinets have been ordered for the new Associational Missions and Resource Center. A few churches

responded to the "\$5 per member challenge." Since 1988 all the churches of the Tar River Association, except five, have made donations towards the Building Fund.

Rev. Wallace reported that carpenters and helpers were needed to do repair work at the home of Rev. Charlie Morgan.

Rev. Wallace announced the summer golf tournament to be held at Hickory Meadows Golf Course on August 9.

He concluded his report by announcing the Key Leadership Conference to be held at Harris Chapel on August 18. Following this conference, Dr. C. Ray Pruette will present a message of challenge and inspiration.

After prayer requests, the meeting adjourned with prayer by Jody Griffin.

September 29, 1997

Moderator for the session was Rev. Gary McNair. Forty-two people were present, representing twenty churches. Epp Catlett was appointed as Parliamentarian.

WMU Director Kathy Freeman reported that the WMU Leadership Team met on August 24, 1997. Fifty-five people attended the WMU Fall Workshop, September 9 at Pearce Baptist Church. Sixteen WMU groups were recognized for their participation in the 1996-97 Project Help: Child Advocacy. The 1997-98 Project Help will focus on Cultural Diversity. Sixteen volunteers, both WMU and non-WMU members helped at the Associational Diaper Change/Cold Water booth at Louisburg's Tar River Festival on September 20. The booth will also be at the Spring Hope Pumpkin Festival on October 4. Events coming up include the following: the Baptist Women's Day of Prayer on November 2 at Oak Grove, an associational-wide International Mission Study on November 17 at Wood, packing gift boxes for the inmates at the Women's Fountain Correctional Center on December 5 at Rocky Cross, and the Christmas Party at the Correctional center on December 6. Each church is encouraged to donate \$80 to help buy the gifts for the inmates. WMU dues of \$2.00 per adult member are due by October 1. WMU Growth Reports are due to the State and Associational WMU by November 1.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton expressed appreciation for the support at the State Missions Offering Rally which was held September 7 at Maple Springs.

Bill Wallace and Gary McNair, reporting for Sunday School Council Director, reported that the Associational Sunday School Training School was held at Pilot on September 25, and that the ACTeam went to Centerville Baptist Church on September 27.

Discipleship Supporter Jody Griffin reported that two churches not previously involved in Bible Drills had attended the Bible Drill Kickoff at Spring Hope on September 16. Three members of the Discipleship Support Team attended training at Caraway.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren reported that the people who attended the music session at the Associational Key Leadership Conference in August provided special music during the worship hour that evening. A good time of praise and worship was enjoyed during Hymn Sing I at Centerville on September 21, and Hymn Sing II at Ephesus on September 28. Association-wide Christmas Caroling will be held in Louisburg on December 22.

Finance Committee Chairman Everette Mangum presented the financial report for August. He expressed appreciation to the churches for their contributions to the Tar River Baptist Association.

Pastor Charlie Morgan of the Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship reported that seven people had been saved recently. The mission had equipped a nursery, started a Sunday School, and donated food and clothing to the Raleigh Rescue Mission. A copier and a sound system have been donated to the mission. Flat Rock donated a van to the mission and voted to house the membership of the mission. The bikers will hold a toy run on November 1, to collect toys for the associational toy ministry. The toy run will end with a pig-picking and live Christian music at the Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship worship facility. Average attendance at the mission is twenty. Thirty-four people attended services on September 28.

Bill Wallace said that over \$8,000 worth of merchandise has been distributed during the toy ministry each year. He encouraged the churches to collect new toys during the months of October and November. At the toy store we give out toys and Bibles, and share Jesus. Children also have the opportunity to select gifts for their parents. Many people have been saved over the years through this ministry.

C. Ray Pruette read a report from Grady Nowell, Pastor of the Hispanic Mission at Franklinton. Attendance at two recent socials are as follows: sixteen on August 23 and twenty-one on September 27. Sunday Bible Study attendance is from about nine to sixteen. English classes are also offered.

Luis Maravi, Pastor of the Victory in Christ Hispanic Mission, reported that average attendance last quarter was eighty-eight and ninety-five the current quarter. Four were baptized in July and recently nine have made decisions to receive Christ. In August VBS was held with sixty-one children and sixteen workers. Two new Sunday School classes have been started.

Bill Wallace added to the Victory in Christ report by announcing that Carson Barnes had offered property to the mission to build a church and parking lot. Recently a meeting was held with John Jones from the NC Baptist State Convention to look at budgeting. The monies given by the Association and State Convention are decreasing as the mission takes more financial responsibity for its budgetary requirements.

Bill Wallace, reporting on the mission at Lake Royale, said that he preaches at the mission every Sunday morning. Namette Warren plays the piano. Terry and Jenny Alford are in charge of the music. A full breakfast is served each Sunday. The group is self supporting and continues to grow. The attendance is between thirty-five and fifty. The people at the mission give monthly to World Hunger thru the convention. They recently gave \$200 to the State Missions Offering. Several months ago Lake Royale Christian Ministries gave \$1,000 for Disaster Relief at Pilot, and \$1,000 for Disaster Relief at Zebulon.

Bill Wallace presented the proposed 1998 budget. Everette Mangum made a motion from the Finance Committee to recommend this budget to the association at the annual meeting. After discussion, the vote carried.

Bill Wallace presented the tentative 1998 Calendar. C. Ray Pruette made a motion that the calendar be recommended to the association at the annual meeting. Adolphus

Batchelor seconded the motion and the vote carried.

Bill Wallace presented the proposed agenda for the October 20 Annual Fall Meeting to be held at Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church. Ed Carroll made a motion that the agenda be recommended to the association at the annual meeting. Adolphus Batchelor seconded the motion and the vote carried.

Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report, said that we are now in the process of painting the new building. Carpet will soon be installed. Vinyl and ceramic floor coverings and much of the plumbing have been installed. Still needed is some electrical work, landscaping, concrete, and gravel for the parking lot. Some furniture has been donated from banks, and some bought from state surplus. New tables and chairs are needed for the large conference room. He encouraged the association to finish the building in time to hold the 1997 Christmas Toy Store there.

Continuing his report, he announced that a request has been made from the North Carolina Baptist Men to help clean an area in Zebulon that was damaged by Hurricane Fran. The work will be done on Saturdays. Volunteers are needed immediately.

After prayer requests, the meeting adjourned with prayer by Luis Maravi.

\$		OFFICE RENT: Monthly rental payments on the facility at Route 9, Louisburg, will be necessary until the new Associational Center has been completed. Includes all utilities except telephone. (\$430.00 per month)
\$	1,000.00	SERVICE CONTRACT: Budget covers cost of contract on Cannon copier. The contract covers everything except paper.
\$	250.00	BUILDING REPAIRS: These funds will be used to make necessary repairs to the Tar River Baptist Association's building(s).
\$	100.00	EQUIPMENT REPAIR: This estimated amount is allocated since we do not know the extent of the repairs our equipment will need.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

At the sound of a car in his grandmother's carport, Jason looked out the window and was shocked to see his mother striding toward the house.

She was angry, and Jason shouted, "Lordy, it's momma," as he ran to the back bedroom to call the police.

Just twelve years old, Jason had lived in seven foster care homes and with his grandmother on and off since his father died seven years earlier. His mother's addictions had cost her custody of her only son. For whatever reason, tonight she wanted him back.

Out of control, Jason's mother broke open the door and kicked grandmother to the floor. "She slung me around by the hair of my head," Grandmother said.

Mother shouted for Jason to come out of hiding. She grabbed a bottle, broke it,

and held the jagged edge to the Grandma's throat, shouting that she would kill her if Jason didn't come out of hiding.

Just then Jason's aunt arrived from a house next door, and held his mother's arms until the police arrived.

Six years later, Grandmother beams with pride for Jason, who overcame that tragic, traumatic start in life. Jason garnered academic, athletic and leadership honors in a steady stream at Tuscola High School in Haywood County and is starting college in August 1997 as a freshman at The Citadel.

At Tuscola, Jason served as vice president of his senior class; Cadet Colonel and ROTC Commander for a group of 1125 Cadets; peer helper and counselor; and Captain and MVP of the track and cross country teams. He was a conference champion. Being in the top ten percent of his class, Jason was inducted into the National Honor Society and attended leadership events at Western Carolina University and Washington, D.C.

At The Citadel he will study political science with a minor in military history and international affairs. He wants to be a fighter pilot and upon retirement to enter politics.

Jason credits Broyhill Home, his home since that traumatic night in his grandmother's's house. "All the accomplishments of my life have been made possible by Baptist Children's Homes," Jason said at his final awards banquet at Broyhill Home,

where he received top honors for the second year. "Broyhill has made me into a young man with a future, who knows now where he is going and what he wants to do. They've opened the doors to enable me to do that."

As for Grandmother, who was desperate to find a place for Jason after the incident in her house, she thanks God every night that we have a place like Broyhill Home and

the Baptist Children's Homes."

Jason's story is repeated hundreds of times each year at Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. While all are not as dramatic, every one tells of a young person and a family at the end of an unraveling rope, and of BCH tying a knot in that rope and helping them to hold on.

At four residential campuses, six emergency care cottages, two homes for behaviorally troubled girls, a maternity home, a home for teenage mothers and their babies, therapeutic camping and model daycare, 1,398 young people found help in

troubled times last year.

During the past year BCH received \$1.5 million through the Cooperative Program and \$724,000 through the Thanksgiving offering. Total church gifts of \$3.05 million

comprised twenty-five percent of the BCH budget.

In June 1997, BCH successfully completed the \$10.1 million "Light the Way" Campaign to raise money for operations, capital needs and endowment. Two major priorities of the campaign will be completed in early 1998: The Winifred Lindsay Education/Administrative Center at Odum Home in Pembroke, and the John D. and Amelia W. Johnson Cottage at Mills Home. A third priority, the Hubert M. Craig Lode at Cameron Boys Camp, has been completed.

A new video, "Families Under construction" is available to promote the 1997 Thanksgiving Offering, which has a statewide goal of \$750,000, the largest ever.

A model program for family preservation has been initiated at Mills Home in Thomasville. Two social workers are on staff to work intensively with families which are at risk of being separated, but can overcome their issues and stay together.

Thomasville Area Director Bill Scarlett is initiating ways for churches and their members to be directly involved on campus by tutoring, cooking, or spending early evenings giving personal attention to residents so that staff is free for more intensive counseling.

Baptist Children's Homes was featured in November on "The 700 Club" and in December on CNN. BCH also adopted a missions statement this year, which is "Helping hurting children, healing broken families."

The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased individual collective financial support. The Baptist Foundation is committed to assisting individual church members through creative stewardship methods to provide permanent financial undergirding of these ministries.

As of December 31, 1996, the Foundation held \$60,892,220 under management. In 1996, \$2,600,680 was distributed to Baptist work, and \$1,259,082 was distributed to individuals for a total distribution of \$3,859,762.

The income distributions for the entire seventy-seven year history of the NC Baptist Foundation total: \$10,932,764 paid to individuals and \$16,059,259 paid to Baptist churches, institutions, and missions causes. The grand historical total of these distributions is \$26,992,023.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Meeting the Challenges of Healthcare

HOSPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

Since opening its doors in 1923, the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated has remained fully committed to the purpose of carrying out the ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. It is this Christ-like spirit that has led patients such as Helen Keller to write: "When I was coming out from under surgery, they treated me with fine love, and I could feel it. I have been in places where it didn't matter how many times you pressed the call button, you would just lie there and wait, but the nurses at Baptist Hospital always came right away. If I ever have to go back to hospital, this is where I would come."

Baptist Benevolent Care Fund

Baptist churches from all across North Carolina joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the

Baptist State convention of North Carolina in 1924. In 1996 the MDO amounted to \$456,497.00. It was used exclusively to help patients who had little or no health care insurance or other financial means pay their hospital bill. This past year's offering of over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our Baptist Churches. May God bless all those who gave so generously.

Division of Pastoral Care

On Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday, the Chaplains and Staff of the Pastoral Care Department provide worship services in Davis Chapel for patients and family members. The Pastoral Care Department staff supervised sixty-five students during the year. They made more that 50,000 ministry contacts, an increase of ten percent over the previous year.

CareNet, Inc continued to grow. Thirteen counseling centers are now located in strategic areas across the state. During the year these centers will provide over

26,000 hours of counseling.

The Center for congregational Health, Inc. continues to expand its assistance to ministers and churches. Programs and assistance offered to the churches include Consultants and Intentional Interims who work with churches helping them face the challenges of today. The Young Leader's Program helps in leadership development and the Clergy Wellness Program, Turning Point, is designed to foster a holistic growthapproach to the individual minster's life calling.

Points of Emphasis and Progress

J. PAUL STICHT CENTER - In April the J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation opened the doors of a new 240,000 square foot state-of-the-arts building. Services provided to the older adults include a geriatric assessment clinic, Acute Care for the Elderly clinic, Alzheimer's disease and memory disorders clinic, osteoporosis clinic, geriatric gynecology clinic, a women's health center, education services, and a legal clinic. It houses a true "Day Hospital" for seniors - the first in the state - which provides therapy, examinations and rehabilitation as day-time treatment, eliminating costly overnight stays.

COMPREHAB - On November 4, 1996, the Medical Center's new CompRehab Center was opened. The 70,000 square-foot building houses a full spectrum of physical rehabilitation and related clinical services, including a Sports Medicine Center, Foot and Ankle Center, The Hand Center, Outpatient Physical therapy Center, Spine Center,

and the Neuro-rehabilitation Center.

TRAUMA CENTER - The Medical Center has the only designated Level I trauma center in Northwest North Carolina. Our goal is for the patient to be in an operating room ten minutes after arriving at the Emergency Department. Surgeons, anesthesiologists, and staff remain on duty 24 hours a day to handle such emergencies.

TOPS IN RESEARCH - According to a report in the February issue of Applied Clinical Trials, Bowman Gray School of Medicine ranked in the top ten U.S. clinical research

institutions.

OUALCHOICE - Established by the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated, The Bowman Gray School of Medicine, and Wake Forest University, this managed care plan provides quality health care and patient physician choice. QualChoice in now able to offer coverage to ministers and church staffs.

The Biblical Recorder tries to tell the whole story with a focus on the many positive things people are doing in their churches and world missions, along with the crucial issues which cannot be concealed and ignored if we honor our heritage from yesterday and fulfill our mission for tomorrow.

These issues cannot be addressed without correct and reliable information. The Biblical Recorder was born and continues to serve for that purpose. In the 164 years of state Baptist papers in North Carolina, never was the Recorder more needed than now for people to have the truth.

At the very time of an increased number of publications and periodicals people are reading less than any time in recent history . It is true of secular publications; it is true of wholesome books from respected libraries; it is true of religious publications. We live in an electronic age, which some have described as an "information glut."

An informed Baptist is a better Baptist; no democracy, including our local churches, can survive long without an informed, involved constituency which makes decisions based upon accurate information from reliable sources.

The Biblical Recorder should be in every Baptist home in North Carolina. Your support as a subscriber and reader, coupled with your encouragement to others, will enable the paper to better serve the constituency with accurate and helpful information. To save churches large amounts of money and to increase the readership of the Recorder, Church News Service (CNS) was launched in 1990. CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC. Annual Report to the Associations, 1997

According to Dr. James Kennedy of Coral Ridge Ministries, approximately 6 million crimes are committed in the United States annually. Murder arrests of teens are up 92% since 1985; the number of 13- to 15-year-olds arrested for murder nearly doubled between 1982 and 1992; 1.6 million cars are stolen each year; America spends \$39 billion a year on police protection, \$29 billion on prisons and \$10 billion on legal and judicial costs for criminal cases; drunk drivers cost us \$110 billion a year, and drug abuse costs \$40 billion a year. With these alarming statistics, the Christian Action League of North Carolina is constantly working to restore moral and biblical principles to our state and nation through the legislative process and the public education system and by assisting communities in our state with local battles for civic and moral righteousness.

Christian Values

It was the pleasure of the Christian Action League to sponsor the Second Annual Christian Heritage Week in North Carolina, March 16-22. The League encouraged schools, churches and communities to recognize, commemorate, and learn about the Christian heritage and history of our nation. We mailed information about a League sponsored essay contest to be written on America's Christian Heritage to all high schools (public and private) in the state and hosted an awards ceremony and banquet for the top state winners of that contest in Raleigh.

The CAL lobbied for and promoted $\underline{SB\ 442}$, The American History Act. A bill that would allow public school teachers to read or display historical documents even though they contain religious references. This bill passed the legislature and is now a law.

The League continued the project in 1997 of distributing copies of the Ten Commandments throughout North Carolina. To date, over 10,000 copies of these prints have been distributed.

Promoted Sanctity of Human Life Sunday

Copies of Dr. Billy Graham's speech to the May 5, 1997, Joint Session of the General Assembly were presented on audio cassette to members of the Legislature. Copies were offered through our newsletter. Dr. Graham was being honored for his tremendous worldwide contributions to religion, morality, racial equality and family.

CAL promoted and worked for the passage of <u>HB 511</u>. <u>Evolution Not Taught as Fact.</u>
The League published *The Beacon* Newsletter quarterly with circulation of 22,000.
Kept concerned citizens informed on moral issues via e-mail, fax networks, and church and civic club presentations.

Lottery

Lottery proponents felt this was the year to bring a state-sponsored lottery to North Carolina. The League, through letters, e-mail and faxes, kept the Christian community updated on lottery information and encouraged its members to contact their legislators. The lawmakers received a barrage of letters and calls from across the state saying that the lottery was a bad bet for North Carolina. The League will continue to monitor this issue as the session nears an end, but as of today, the lottery seems to have been defeated for another session.

Sex Education

CAL worked with other Christian and pro-family groups to see that the state mandate for Abstinence Until Marriage education was implemented state-wide. The League supported efforts to insure that federal grant money was used to promote abstinence education.

Abortion

The League lobbied for and encouraged its members through Legislative Alerts to write letters to representatives in support of HB 303 and SB 536 (Ban Partial Birth Abortion), HB 594 (Fetus Death from Criminal Act) and HB 536 (Abortion/Woman's Right to Know). We offered the video "Reversing Roe" through our newsletter. This video tells the story of Norma McCorvey (Jane Roe) of the infamous Roe vs. Wade Supreme Court case who after 25 years and 35 million aborted babies tells of her transformation from an abortion industry pawn to a pro-life Christian.

Homosexuality

CAL supported efforts to strengthen the traditional family and addressed the radical homosexual agenda. We successfully lobbied against legislation that would have eradicated present N. C. law making homosexuality illegal. The League offered the powerful and emotional video of Michael Johnston "On Wings Like Eagles" which tells of Michael's 11 years in the homosexual lifestyle and his struggle between right and wrong, and forgiveness and grace. Michael is founder of Kerusso Ministries, an organization to help others struggling with this sin.

Alcohol

The League monitored all legislation concerning alcohol and other drugs. We successfully supported efforts to strengthen current DWI laws and worked with communities in helping them set up an organization to combat liquor referenda. CaL lobbied against SB838 (ABC Tourism Resorts Permits); SB 837 (Sports Club ABC Permits); SB 447 (Lumberton Economic Development District); and HB 651 (Interstate Economic Zones). These bills allow alcohol sales without the vote of local citizens. We provided awareness, education, and resource materials related to substance abuse problems to churches, communities, etc.

CAL lobbied for SB 452 (Local Regulation of Adult Establishments) by encouraging citizens to contact their legislators and regarding their vote for this legislation that would give local governments more control in regulating these establishments.

BYLAWS of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc.

PREAMBLE

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Corporation to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches; and to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Corporation.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. There shall be two (2) classes of membership in the Corporation: voting and non-voting. The non-voting membership shall be composed of all of the members of the churches affiliated with the Corporation. Voting members of the Corporation shall be known as messengers and shall be elected annually by each of the individual churches affiliated with the Corporation in accordance with the following schedule: Each church is entitled to four (4) messengers. Any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred (200) is entitled to two (2) additional messengers per one hundred (100) members (or major fraction thereof) in excess of two (200) hundred. No church shall be entitled to more than ten (10) messengers.

SECTION 2. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the Corporation shall constitute a guorum at meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The Corporation shall meet bi-annually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session.

ARTICLE IV - RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE CORPORATION

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Corporation by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator and the Director of Missions shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES OF THE CORPORATION

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Corporation by filing the Annual Church Profile; to send messengers to the bi-annual meetings of the Corporation; to give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Corporation. The Corporation secretary (known as the Clerk) shall furnish the churches with the necessary printed forms and/or software for their Annual Church Profiles. These materials are to be distributed to the churches at least six (6) weeks before the Annual Fall session of the Corporation. The churches are requested to have the Church Profiles in the hands of the Clerk not less than two weeks before the fall meeting of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE CORPORATION

SECTION 1. The Corporation shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

SECTION 2. The Corporation may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that treats with contempt the purposes and requirements of the Corporation, or that applies for its own dismissal. The Corporation may also dissolve connection with any church that does not file a Church Profile or have messengers attending its Annual Fall Meetings for two (2) consecutive years.

ARTICLE VII - OFFICERS

The officers of the Corporation shall be: Director of Missions, Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Trustees.

ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to lead the Corporation to fulfill its mission faithfully, effectively, and lovingly. His role is three-dimensional: (1) mission strategist, (2) minister to the churches, pastors, and other church staff members, and (3) general leader of the Corporation. Within the limits of his time and ability, he is to respond to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Corporation.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Clerk (also known as the Secretary) to provide administrative support services to the Director of Missions and to the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. It shall also be the duty of the Clerk to record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the bi-annual meetings and of the Executive Board, and to make this information available on request. The Clerk shall use all diligence to have the record of transactions printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible; and to distribute to the church clerks reminders about, and forms for, the Annual Church Profile. The Clerk shall also serve as ex-

officio Secretary of the Executive Board.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to plan for and preside over the bi-annual and called meetings of the Corporation and the quarterly Executive Board meetings, and to encourage fellowship and mutual care among the churches. He shall open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. The Moderator shall appoint a Parliamentarian to serve at each meeting of the Corporation and the Executive Board

Meetings. He shall also serve as ex-officio chairman of the Executive Board. Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two (2) one-year terms in succession.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to assist in developing fellowship and mutual care among the churches and church leaders. He shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in the Moderator's absence, serve as vicechairman of the Executive Board, and serve as Chairman of the Executive Council.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to assist in receiving, accounting, and disbursing of all the Corporation's monies as authorized by the Corporation or the Executive Board. By virtue of his office, the Treasurer shall be an ex officio member of the Finance Committee.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to act as the legal agents of the Corporation and shall hold title of all property of the Corporation. In the name of the Corporation they shall be authorized and empowered to receive title to real and personal property, and to sell and convey or mortgage same upon authority duly given by the Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. are also responsible for keeping an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Corporation, a copy of which is to be kept on file in the Corporation's Office. Trustees are to be three (3) in number, and they are to serve for a term of three (3) years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

The Committees of the Corporation are administrative in nature. administrative Committees are as follows: Nominating; Credentials; Finance; Resolutions; Time, Place, and Preacher; Program; By-Laws; Christian Education; Strategy; Properties; History; and others deemed necessary or desirable. Committee shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. Committee members shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin immediately upon the adjournment of the Annual Fall Meeting of the Corporation. Members are allowed to serve more than one term in succession.

ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to nominate all officers, leaders, committeemen, and council representatives with the exception of the Director of Missions, the Clerk, and any other paid employees. This committee is to be appointed by the Moderator, and shall retain at least two (2) of its members from the preceding year.

SECTION 2. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in determining when churches are of like faith and order, and when they can be properly accepted in the fellowship of the Corporation. It is also the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Corporation as voting members of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in securing, administering, and reporting its finances. This committee will plan and propose an annual budget to the Executive Board and suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. This committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. At least two (2) of its members shall be retained from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as an ex-officio member of this committee.

SECTION 4. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in studying resolutions for adoption by the Corporation or the Executive Board. This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Corporation's feelings in regard to the biannual meetings, officers of the Corporation, host churches, and other matters.

SECTION 5. The TIME, PLACE, and PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place, and preacher for the bi-

annual meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Corporation and the host pastors of the bi-annual meetings. It shall be their duty to assist the Corporation in planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Corporation. They shall receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form for the bi-annual meetings which, upon the adoption by the Corporation, shall become its order of business.

SECTION 7. The BYLAWS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to make recommendations relative to Bylaw changes. This Committee shall receive all proposed changes and/or amendments to the Bylaws of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc., and upon study of said changes and/or amendments make recommendations to the Corporation concerning said changes and/or amendments.

SECTION 8. The CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to keep before the churches of the Corporation all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

SECTION 9. The STRATEGY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in determining strategic objectives and staying on course in achieving them.

SECTION 10. The PROPERTIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in properties administration. This Committee shall develop and recommend policies and procedures for using the Corporation's facilities and equipment.

SECTION 11. The HISTORY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Corporation's life and work.

ARTICLE XI - INSTITUTIONAL AND AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES

The Denomination's Institutional and Agency Representatives shall include the following: Annuity Board, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes, Christian Higher Education, Religious Literature, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Mission. The representatives for these institutions and agencies shall be responsible for providing information to the churches during the year, and/or giving reports on the work of the institutions and agencies at the biannual meetings of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XII - MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

The Mission Performance Councils undergird and give support to the work of program related ministries of the Corporation. Training leadership shall be a primary responsibility of these Councils. All Mission Performance Councils shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. These Mission Performance Councils are as follows: Seminary Extension, Ordination Advisory, Music, Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Vacation Bible School, Recreation, Media Library, Pastoral Ministries, Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions Development, Youth Ministry, and Family Ministry.

ARTICLE XIII - DUTIES OF THE MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

SECTION 1. The SEMINARY EXTENSION COUNCIL shall direct any Seminary Extension Program for the churches affiliated with the Corporation. This Council shall be composed of at least (5) members.

SECTION 2. The ORDINATION ADVISORY COUNCIL shall be composed of at least (5) members. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to act only in an advisory capacity for churches seeking assistance in examining prospective candidates approved for ordination. This Council shall conduct its work within the guidelines of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The MUSIC COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. This Council shall plan and implement the music program of the Corporation. They shall recommend to the Program Committee the music for the bi-annual meetings, and they shall enlist accompanists for all Corporation Meetings.

SECTION 4. The SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of the ASSISTeam to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate Sunday School Work. [note: name changed to ACTeam - Associational Consultant Team]

SECTION 5. The DISCIPLESHIP SUPPORT TEAM shall be composed of at least two (2) members and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of this team to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the total Discipleship Ministry of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION shall consist of the leadership recommended by the WMU Nominating Committee and elected by the Corporation's WMU. This Council will have the responsibility of planning, promoting, conducting, and evaluating WMU work.

SECTION 7. The BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL shall be composed of the officers of the Corporation's Brotherhood. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the work of Baptist Men and also the work of Royal Ambassadors.

SECTION 8. The VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. The Vacation Bible School Council Director is the leader of the VBS Team

and shall plan and promote the Corporation's VBS Clinics. The age-group VBS leaders

who comprise this team shall be responsible for conducting the VBS Clinics.

SECTION 9. The RECREATION COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members whose duty it shall be to help plan, coordinate, promote, and conduct the entire recreation program of the Corporation. They shall be available to assist any entity of the Corporation with the planning and conducting of recreational activities. The work of this Council includes setting up and supervising the Basketball Program, and any other Sports Program that may be started. This Council will also plan, promote, and conduct the Annual Royal Ambassador Track Meet, and the Annual Royal Ambassador Car Competition.

SECTION 10. The MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL shall consist of at least three (3) members. This Church Media Library Organization is often referred to as TACMO. shall be the responsibility of this Council to provide for the mutual sharing of inspiration and information for furthering the Church Media Center Ministry of the

affiliated churches.

SECTION 11. The PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL shall be composed of the following: (1) Pastoral Ministries Director, (2) Church Administration Services Coordinator, (3) Deacon Ministry Coordinator, (4) Vocational Guidance Coordinator, and (5) Church Weekday Education Coordinator, and any others that may be deemed necessary or advisable. The duties of this Council shall be to determine the pastoral ministries emphasis needed or desired and to schedule the events in cooperation with the total programming of the Corporation. The major task of the Council shall be the development and training of ministers through conferences, workshops, clinics, awareness meetings, retreats, and ministry support groups.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. It shall be the duty of this Council to plan and promote any evangelism programs, training projects, and rallies needed or desired. It shall also be the responsibility of this Council to keep evangelism before the pastors and laypeople

of the Corporation.

SECTION 13. The STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for stewardship development and promotion within or among the churches of the Corporation. It will be the task of this Council to seek to lead the churches to set specific, attainable, measurable stewardship goals.

SECTION 14. The MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall consist of at least seven (7) members. This Council shall be responsible for missions development in the total program of the Corporation. The Council shall not only be concerned with already established missions, mission work, and mission activities; it shall be concerned with beginning new mission work. It will be their responsibility to study the missionary needs of the Corporation and make recommendations concerning new work. They shall also recommend missions projects or activities with which the churches in the Corporation may cooperate. They shall strive to get each church in the Corporation to elect or appoint a Church Mission Development Council.

SECTION 15 The YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least (5) members, shall be responsible for planning youth related ministries for the Corporation including

retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

SECTION 16. The FAMILY MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for helping to plan, promote, and conduct any program emphasis related to family life. This Council should strive to include the needs of senior adults, single adults, marriage partners, parents, and children.

ARTICLE XIV - THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Executive Council shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, the Directors of the various Program Councils, and three members at large. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to assist the Director of Missions in planning, coordinating, promoting, and executing the Corporation's Programs, making recommendations to the Executive Board or to the Corporation in its Annual Fall Meeting. It shall also be the duty of this Council to plan the annual calendar. This Council shall meet quarterly on another Monday evening prior to each Executive Board meeting, and at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or Moderator.

ARTICLE XV - THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Corporation Officers and key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Pastor, Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Board Members shall be members of the church they represent. If a church does not have one or more of

these leaders, it may appoint a substitute for each vacancy and shall submit the

name/names with the church profile.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall meet quarterly usually during March, June, September, and November on Monday night following the fourth Sunday of the month unless a conflict necessitates moving the meeting to Monday after the third or fifth Sunday. The Executive Board may meet at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator for the purpose of transacting special or urgent business.

SECTION 3. Although each church should earnestly strive to get its full contingent of key leaders to attend, there is no quorum requirement for transacting

business at a regular or called meeting of the Executive Board.

SECTION 4. The Director of Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive Board and does not have the power to vote.

SECTION 5. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as follows:

a. The Executive Board is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary, and to define his duties.

b. To act for the Corporation between regular sessions of the body.

c. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes. d. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching

of stewardship. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Corporation the annual budget, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director

of Missions relative to the program to be fostered by the Corporation. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Board in the name of the Corporation shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year, without specific authorization

of the Corporation. ARTICLE XVI - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Corporation, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of

ARTICLE XVII - AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of the Corporation's meeting. The said amendment(s) must be presented to the afternoon session and voted on no earlier than the evening session.

ARTICLE XVIII - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES

The business of the Corporation shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE XIX - BUSINESS PROCEDURE

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session

which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body. 3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the

Moderator as a member of the Corporation or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator, and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

- 7. Any resolution to be presented to the Executive Board and/or bi-annual meetings must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Corporation and published in the Corporation's newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.
- 8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each Fall Session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting

and elect a preacher for the annual sermon.

10. Reports of committees must be brief - not exceeding five hundred words. Other reports should not exceed three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

- 12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Librarian of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina; Biblical Recorder, Raleigh, North Carolina; Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina; Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee; and State Baptist Convention.
- 13. The host churches of the bi-annual meetings shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words). These histories shall be printed in the annual minutes of the Corporation.

Proceedings For Spring Session

Held at First Baptist Church, Spring Hope Assisted by Ephesus Baptist Church April 20, 1998

AFTERNOON SESSION

Moderator: Adolphus Batchelor

Clerk: Georgette Guin 1. Prelude music was provided by pianist Joann Wallace, and organist Nanette Warren. Both of Pilot Baptist Church.

2. The 168th Semi-Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Moderator Adolphus Batchelor, Holly Grove Baptist Church.

- 3. Director of Missions Bill Wallace, Pilot Baptist Church, explained that the program was built around the theme "Each Church on Mission." He said that his desire was to see every church involved in missions, locally and around the world. He announced that the association now has a Church and Community Missions Director, Gail Nelms, who will help the churches to be on mission. He then led in singing the hymn "Break Out, O Church of God."
- 4. Rev. Jody Griffin, First Baptist Church, Spring Hope, welcomed everyone to the church.
 - 5. Rev. Clark Rounds, Ephesus Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
- 6. Mr. Batchelor organized the session, and appointed Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock Baptist Church, as parliamentarian.
- 7. Rev. Wallace presented the program and made a recommendation that it be adopted as printed. Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church made a motion that the recommendation be accepted. Rev. Ed Carroll, Peachtree Baptist Church, seconded the motion. The vote carried.
- 8. Rev. Wallace recognized and welcomed the following new pastors: Pastor Chad Rickenbaker, Ransdell Chapel; and Pastor Robert Kantner, Perry's Chapel.
- 9. Rev. Griffin announced that he would be leaving First Baptist Church, Spring Hope to accept a call to a church in Kings Mountain, North Carolina.
- 10. The histories of the host churches were presented by Mr. Earl Purkerson of First Baptist Church, Spring Hope; and Rev. Rounds of Ephesus Baptist Church.
- 11. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "The Church of Christ in Every Age."
- After an introduction by Rev. Wallace, Dr. R. G. Puckett shared information about the Biblical Recorder. The state paper was founded because Baptist got serious about world missions. It started as a monthly publication. In January 1834 it became a weekly publication. In September 1997 the Biblical Recorder went on the "web site". The moral obligation of the paper is to print the truth.
- 13. Rev. Wallace announced the Vacation Bible School Clinic for all workers to be held on April 23 at West End Baptist Church. This clinic is a joint effort between the Tar River, Flat River, and Cullom associations. This clinic will be led by state workers.
- 14. Rev. Wallace announced the Associational Vacation Bible School Clinic to be held on May 26 at the First Baptist Church, Spring Hope. It will begin with a light supper, and will be led by the Associational VBS Council.
- 15. Rev. Wallace announced the Choral Clinic to be held for all church choirs on May 14 at Pilot Baptist Church. Mr. Dan Ridley from the NC Baptist State Convention will lead the clinic.
- 16. Rev. Wallace announced that a construction team was being put together to go to Cape Town, South Africa to renovate an old house for use as an associational office. This team will be gone May 21-June 2. Rev. Wallace will be going to South Africa in June to preach revival. He needs Pastors and Ministers of Music to go with him.
- 17. Rev. Wallace reported that landscaping was needed to get into the new associational building. The new associational building also needed 125 chairs at \$30 each and fifteen tables at \$130 each for the big conference room. He requested that individuals wanting to donate one or more tables or chairs to sign up on the sheet provided.
- 18. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "We Are Called To Be God's People."
- 19. After an introduction by Rev. Wallace, Mr. Bruce Franklin, New Sandy Creek Baptist Church, shared his testimony. Mr. Franklin is Brotherhood Director for the Cullom Baptist Association and also works with the NC Baptist Men's Disaster Recovery Team.
- 20. After sharing a brief testimony, Mr. Russell Bettini, First Baptist Church, Spring Hope read scripture and led in prayer.
- 21. Mrs. Sandra Wood, Red Bud Baptist Church, presented special music.
- 22. Rev. DuPre Sanders, Franklinton Baptist Church, preached the annual sermon.

23. Mr. Clyde Best, First Baptist Church, Spring Hope, gave thanks for the evening meal.

EVENING SESSION

The evening session began with a mini concert by the Glorymen.

2. Rev. Griffin read scripture and led in prayer.

Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "Let Your Heart Be Broken."

Treasurer Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the monthly financial report for March 1998 and the annual financial report for 1997. She expressed appreciation to the churches for their financial support.

- 5. Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report, said that it is a joy to work with people who are so cooperative. He expressed appreciation for what was done to enable the association of churches to be on mission. He explained that the association hired Mrs. Gail Nelms as the Church and Community Missions Director. Part of her job is to work with the churches and talk about mission needs and resources. The goal is for each church to be involved in missions.
- 6. Rev. Wallace continued his report by announcing that the New Associational Missions and Resource Center has been under construction for a little over three years. No money has been borrowed. There is almost \$15,000 in the building fund, but this is not enough. The work of the Tar River Baptist Association would be more effective, and more needs could be met in the new building. The new building project is a joint effort. If every church did their part the association would be in its new building. He urged churches to make one last financial effort to finish the building, and to consider giving \$600 immediately so the project could be completed. The building belongs to the Tar River Baptist Association and is to be used to the glory of God for missions and evangelism.
- 7. Rev. Wallace reminded the association that we are in a partnership with South Africa. A team is being formed to go to South Africa to renovate a house for an associational office. Six people (masons, painters, handymen, and carpenters) are needed. The cost is \$1850 round trip.

8. Rev. Wallace reported that furniture was needed in the big conference room of the new building as follows: fifteen tables at \$130 each and 125 chairs at \$30 each. A sign up sheet was provided for those wanting to donate chairs and tables.

- Rev. Wallace reported on local missions work being done by the association. Ministries are being conducted at the Bunn Prison and the Louisburg Manor. He conducts non-denominational services at Lake Royale every Sunday. Recently Tar River churches were involved in sending boxes of food to Korea for famine relief. Fifty-seven boxes from Tar River were reported.
- The Royale Heirs, a choir from the Lake Royale ministry, provided special music.
- 11. Associational Discipleship Support Director Wendy Edwards, First Baptist Church, Spring Hope announced that she was blessed the last five years with an assistant. This assistant, Rev. Jody Griffin, helped her all over North Carolina with her work for the NC Baptist State Convention, and also with her work in the Tar River Baptist Association. She said that she was also blessed because Rev. Griffin was her pastor. She presented him with a small token of gratitude from the Associational Discipleship Support Team.
- Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "Hark, The Voice Of Jesus Calling." Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reporting for the Credentials Committee, said that attendance at the Spring 1998 meeting was as follows: 27 churches represented by 67 messengers, 7 alternates, 15 pastors, 15 associational officers, and 39 guests for a total of 143 people.
- 21. Rev. Ed Carroll, Peachtree Baptist Church, announced his retirement on April 15, 1998. He said that he and his wife have moved to Cade's Country in Youngsville, He shared the resolutions as submitted by the Resolutions Committee Chairman

Tom Eldridge as follows:

Resolution 1:

Whereas First Baptist Church, Spring Hope, assisted by Ephesus Baptist Church, has hosted Tar River Baptist Association's Semi-Annual Meeting,

And whereas they have provided graciously of God's blessings, fellowship, and food;

Be it therefore resolved that we hereby express to each church our appreciation for their loving, gracious and all-sufficient efforts to provide for the needs of all who attended this session of the Tar River Baptist Association. Resolution 2:

Whereas Mr. Adolphus Batchelor has faithfully served as Moderator of our

Association and whereas he has presided with godliness, dignity and expertise;

Be it therefore resolved that we express to him our love with genuine gratitude for the leadership, stability and consistency he has provided throughout his term of service.

Resolution 3:

Whereas the Reverend Bill Wallace has served the Tar River Baptist Association for more than ten years with foresight, commitment, vigor, and with unselfish

Whereas his love for God Almighty and our Savior Jesus Christ is evident in his

words, actions and deportment, and

Whereas he has encouraged us to be on mission, and

Whereas he has shown his love for each Association church, church member and

Whereas his efforts to see our Association building completed have been

untiring,

Be it therefore resolved that we express to the Reverend Wallace our deep love and appreciation, and

Be it finally resolved that we commit to pray for his ministry to the glory of God.

Resolution 4:

Whereas Ms. Georgette Guin faithfully serves as our Association Secretary and Clerk with faithfulness, dedication and diligence, and

Whereas she daily assists churches and individuals exhibiting love for them and

love for Christ,

Be it therefore resolved that we express our love and appreciation to Ms. Guin for the sweet spirit with which she serves and her contribution to God's work in our community.

Rev. Carroll made a motion that the resolutions be adopted. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Elaine Lewis, Pilot Baptist Church, and the vote carried.

22. Special music was presented by Heavenly Comfort, a quartet of women from Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church. They are Donna Anderson, Robin Brannan, Melody Brown, and Joann Mitchell.

23. A special drama presentation was given by Crosswalk, two ladies (Leigh Ann Thomas and Holly Needham) from Sanford, NC.

24. Mr. Richard Morgan, Franklinton Baptist Church, adjourned the meeting with prayer.

HISTORY OF FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, SPRING HOPE

Spring Hope Baptist Church was chartered and organized on December 29 and 30, 1889 with four known charter members. At the Tar River Association in October 1890, Spring Hope reported thirteen members, worship services once a month, with Elder John A. Bridgers as pastor. Bridgers was ordained in 1891 and stayed with the local church until 1892. Worship services were held in an unused building in the downtown area. Planks were placed over nail kegs for seats. Later services took place in a one-room school building on Walnut Street, where most community functions took place. Joint Sunday School was held there every Sunday afternoon for Baptists and Methodists alike.

By 1895 the church had acquired the property on Walnut Street where the present church facilities are located. A frame church was reported to the Association in 1895 - the cost, \$700; seating capacity, 200; and members, 42. When the Tar River Association was divided in 1907-08, Spring Hope Church became a member of the Roanoke Association. A new brick church with a seating capacity of 500 was erected in 1909-10 at a value of \$12,000. Electric lights and a central heating system were enjoyed for the first time. Beautiful stained-glass windows were installed. This building is still in use today. The first electric organ was purchased in 1937. The fiftieth anniversary of the church was celebrated in 1939.

The baptistry was not installed until 1921-22. Prior to that baptism were administered in Tar River near Webb's Mill. An education building was erected beside the church in 1950, and in 1955 a permanent parsonage was built at 309 Nash Street. The church was reunited with the Tar River Association in 1958. The sanctuary was renovated in 1960. The Putnam Room was enlarged, furnished with pews, and re-named the Morgan Chapel.

The church library was initiated in December 1962. Beginning that year the church letter "Gabriel" was issued twice a month. Later the newsletter was renamed "The Letter" and became a weekly publication. The tape ministry for the homebound

was started in 1973.

A new electric organ was purchased in 1976; the parking lot property was bought in 1981; and the van and sound system in 1984. The grounds were re-landscaped in 1985, and in 1986 the church offices were moved from the second floor to street level for easier access. The offices were refurnished and equipped appropriately. In the meantime, a new tradition, "Hanging of the Greens" had been initiated. Plexiglass was installed over the stain glassed windows, and a stained glass window was placed in the front of the baptistery in 1986.

The library was updated in 1987, and four brass chandeliers were installed in the sanctuary. Many memorial gifts have made the church more comfortable, more pleasant in appearance, and more conducive to deep spiritual worship. The music program has always been and continued to be excellent. All phases of the work of First Baptist church are executed with Christian love, faith, prayer, support, and

caring concern.

We celebrate the firm foundations begun by so many in our first 108 years, and we look forward expectantly to years of service and ministry in the Lord's name. God bless First Baptist church as we seek to continue the ministry of Jesus Christ in our community through worship, Christian education, and stewardship of life. Our mission is to help others come to know Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior and to grow mature in His spirit.

HISTORY OF EPHESUS BAPTIST CHURCH

Ephesus Missionary Baptist Church was founded on August 14, 1880 as a result of preaching services held under a brush arbor by the Rev. George W. Coppedge during the 1870s. The charter members were S.J. Batchelor, Mary G. Fulford, J.H. Valentine, H.M. and Anne Warren, and W.M. and Mahlia Warren.

The church began meeting at Bryant School House and continued to do so until 1882 when a church building was erected on land donated by Willis M. Warren.

Since its founding in 1880, the church has had twenty-three pastors: George W. Coppedge, M.J. Willoughby, R.P. Driver, R.D. Carol, J.E. Hocutt, J.P. Gulley, J.W. Nobles, A.A. Pippin, J.N. Stancil, Ernest C. Upchurch, Harvey Coppedge, Jack Falls, Cline Borders, Hugh Borders, Daniel W. Smith, Kenneth L. Payton, Julius H. Lee, Don Lee Hunnings, Douglas S. McLeroy, Ronald Arndt, Johnnie N. Browder, Sr., Danny W. Bullock, and the current pastor Clark J. Rounds who was called by the church in 1982.

Over the course of the years, many changes have occurred in the church. Buildings have been added, improvements made, and equipment purchased. But the major and most lasting changes have occurred in the lives of those who have been members. Through a succession of dedicated Sunday School teachers, deacons, and pastors, the church has grown. A number of individuals have responded to God's call to missions and to the ministry since the founding of the church.

Ephesus has always been a supporter of missions and mission work. From our present membership we have sent volunteer missionaries to such places as Belize, Brazil, New York, South Africa, and Togo. We have also supported disaster relief

work in North Carolina, South Carolina, and Florida.

Our greatest asset and our greatest pride is our people, and we look back on our heritage fully aware that where we find ourselves today is due in great part to the dedicated efforts of the saints who have gone on before us. Our hope is, "since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses," that we might run well that portion of the race that still lies ahead of us in order that future generations might include us as they remember with joy those who have gone before them.

ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The Associational Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met three times since the Annual Meeting in October 1997.

November 24, 1997

Moderator for the session was Adolphus Batchelor. Twenty-seven people representing sixteen churches were present. Epp Catlett was appointed as Parliamentarian.

Georgette Guin, in the absence of WMU Leadership Team Director Kathy Braswell, reported that the WMU will be holding its annual Christmas party at the Fountain Correctional Center for Women in Rocky Mount in December. Each inmate will receive

a box of toiletries and a bag of fruit. These boxes will be packed at Rocky Cross on December 5. The first WMU event for 1998 will be the Brown Bag Lunch on February 7 at Peachtree. Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton announced Baptist Men's Day on January 25 and the 1998 Baptist Missions Conference and Baptist Men's Convention on January 30-31.

Adolphus Batchelor, reporting for the Discipleship Support Team, announced that Heather Nelms from Sandy Creek has been added to the Associational Discipleship

Support Team.

Evangelism Council Director Duane Caldwell reported that he met with Bill Wallace to discuss possibilities for the year.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren announced Association-wide Christmas Caroling on December 22.

Finance Committee Chairman Jimmie Weathers presented the financial report for October.

Georgette Guin, substituting for Charlie Morgan, Pastor at Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship, reported that thirty-eight people attended the worship service at the mission on November 23. The mission has now appointed a constitution committee, a children's church committee, and a finance committee. Seventy people participated in the mission's toy run on November 1.

Luis Maravi, Pastor at the Hispanic Mission, Victory In Christ, reported that average attendance at the mission is eighty. On October 17 Eric Thompson came to the mission with a missionary to Colombia. Both spoke and two people were saved that night. The first Sunday in November, two people were baptized. On November 23, three people were baptized. A Thanksgiving dinner will be held.

Rev. Wallace presented a recommendation from the Associational Council that the WMU groups take toys, cake, and coffee to the "Safe Space" shelter for women in Louisburg. The vote carried.

Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report, said that we are in the final stages of completing the new Associational Building. Before occupancy, the parking lot needs to be prepared. The best price received for this work is a little over \$12,000 and includes the fine grading, spreading and compacting the gravel.

Rev. Wallace continued his report by announcing that the Toy Ministry will be conducted in the new building this year. Setting up the store will take place on December 2-5. Volunteers are needed.

Rev. Wallace concluded his report by announcing that Tar River has been asked to put together several ministry teams to go to South Africa during 1998. Projects will include evangelism, revivals, construction, repair, and training.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Dr. C. Ray Pruette.

February 9, 1998 (Special Called Meeting)

Bill Wallace called the meeting to order, and explained that the order of the day included two items: the parking lot of the new associational building and the hiring of a Church and Community Missions Director.

Rev. Wallace read the recommendation from the Council as follows: that the Association grade and gravel the parking lot of the new Associational Center, and do sidewalks without borrowing money. Gary McNair made a motion to accept the recommendation from the Council. The motion was seconded. Discussion followed. Concern was expressed that someone might question the integrity of the Director of Missions if the association voted to borrow money because he had said that no money would be borrowed. Bids on paving range from \$38,500 to \$60,549. Not included in the paving costs: \$12 a foot for curbing/guttering at driveway, two eighteen inch pipes under driveways, catch basin, \$12 a foot for sidewalks and concrete. If we borrow \$35,000 for fifteen years at eight and a quarter percent interest, the monthly payments would be \$339. We now pay \$430 a month in rent. This would be a savings of \$91 a month. Billy Tharrington led in prayer.

Jody Griffin made a motion to amend the original motion to say that the association borrow \$35,000 for fifteen years and pave the parking lot. The motion was seconded. Discussion followed. Concern was expressed that the monthly payment on the loan may be less than the current rent, but the utilities in the new building may be costly, and if we borrow we'll also be paying a large amount in interest. Some thought that borrowing the money would be manageable, and that we have the resources in our churches to pay for it. Some thought we should finish the building because there is ministry that we could be doing in that new building.

Dr. Pruette called for the question.

The vote on the amendment (borrow and pave) to the original motion did not pass. The vote on the original motion (gravel and do not borrow) passed.

Rev. Wallace explained that money has been in the budget for two years to hire a part-time Church and Community Missions Director. One half of the amount will come from the NC Baptist State Convention. He went over the resume of Gail Nelms, said that she is the wife of Former Moderator Gerald Nelms, and introduced her. He then went over the job description. He said that basically the CCM Director would try to get every church on mission. She would work with two or three churches at a time. She would be knowledgeable of resources available and plug churches into those resources. It is a part-time job with a modest salary.

Rev. Wallace presented the recommendation from the Council and the Finance Committee as follows: that Gail Nelms be hired as the Church and Community Missions Director for the Tar River Baptist Association at a salary of \$6,000 and mileage not

to exceed \$1,200 a year.

Jimmie Weathers made a motion that the recommendation be accepted. The motion was seconded. Discussion followed. Money is in the 1998 budget for the CCM Director and the matching Social Security. Mrs. Nelms did an excellent job at the toy store, with everything being well organized. No health insurance or annuity is being provided by the association at this time.

Epp Catlett called the question. The vote carried. Gail Nelms will begin on February 10, 1998 with training.

The meeting was adjourned.

March 23, 1998

Moderator for the session was Adolphus Batchelor. Forty-four people representing nineteen churches were present. Gary McNair was appointed as Parliamentarian.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton reported that the Hopkins Chapel Community Project is underway. Chain saw work has been done. Some of the wood was moved by members of the Pilot Baptist Church. Bulldozer work will be done in dry weather.

A list of "handyman" volunteers have been started to assist people on fixed or low income with general repairs, etc. Anyone who would like to be on this list should call the associational office.

Discipleship Support Team Member Jody Griffin announced the Associational Bible Drill to be held on April 5 at First Baptist Church, Spring Hope. A Bible Drill Celebration will be held on May 3. Members of the Discipleship Support Team will be attending the State Key Leadership Conference and Associational Discipleship Support Training.

Evangelism Council Director Duane Caldwell reported that the council meets for prayer monthly. One hundred "Jesus" videos have been purchased to be used by the Associational Evangelism Council.

Georgette Guin, reporting for Finance Committee Chairman Jimmie Weathers, presented the monthly financial report for February, and the annual report for 1997.

Rev. Wallace presented a recommendation from the Finance Committee that three new computers be purchased for the associational office, paying the bill in installments. A motion to accept the recommendation was made. The motion was seconded. Discussion followed.

Jackie Stallings made a motion to amend the original motion to say that the computers be purchased and paid in full. The amended motion was seconded. The vote carried.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren announced that some Tar River people sang in the choir at the Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary Revival.

WMU Leadership Team Director Kathy Freeman announced that Elaine Lewis led the North American Mission Study at Pilot, Social Plains, and Cedar Rock Baptist churches. Five members of Tar River have applied for the Volunteer Connection Program, a program offered by the National WMU for mission volunteers. Volunteer Connection training, conducted by the Tar River WMU, will begin in May for anyone interested. Those currently involved are Kathy Freeman (Philadelphia), Georgette Guin (Sandy Creek), Debbie Johnson (Rocky Cross), Elaine Lewis (Pilot), and Debbie Marks (Philadelphia). Several Tar River WMU members will be attending the State WMU Missions Extravaganza at Ridgecrest March 27-29. The WMU Spring Meeting will be held on April 7 at Duke Memorial Baptist Church. Guest speaker will be Jeanette Walters, State WMU staff member. Special music will be provided by the group "Genesis 28:15" from Victory in Christ. An offering will be received at the spring meeting for the Victory in Christ building fund.

Charlie Morgan, Pastor at Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship, reported that average worship attendance at the mission is thirty-three and Sunday School

attendance is twelve. Herbie Mabire is the youth minister. A prayer ministry called "The Proseuchomai" has been started. Each Sunday morning we have a "Ministry Moment" in which hands are layed on anyone needing prayer. We received donations of lights from Union Hope Baptist Church, and a sound system from Holly Grove Baptist Church. One person was led to the Lord this month. We have tentative plans for a Bob Phelps Memorial Run in the near future. A budget is now in place, the constitution has been written, and the by-laws are almost finished.

DuPre Sanders, reporting on the Hispanic Mission at Franklinton, announced that the ministry is now eleven months old. A Bible Study is held each Friday night in the home of one of the mission attenders. Worship services are held each Sunday at 3:00 pm. Grady and Barbara Nowell continue to lead this ministry with Jose Montejo, a student at SEBTS, assisting. An evangelistic event is planned for Saturday, March 28. Approximately twenty-five people will be attending the Easter passion play in Williamston. This play will be in Spanish.

Rev. Wallace announced that he began his twelfth year as the Director of Missions the first of March. He added that the new building is virtually finished except for the necessary grading and graveling of the parking lot. We also have to finish the handicapped rails and ramps before we will be granted an occupancy permit. At some point we will need to buy about fifteen tables and 125 chairs for the large conference room. Since 1987 churches, individuals, and other sources have given approximately \$257,918.00 towards the building fund. Spent during that time on the land and the building is approximately \$243,507.00. In addition to monies in the building fund, we need approximately \$10,000.00 to complete the landscaping. We urge our churches and individual church members to make one last financial effort so that we can complete this project.

We are still trying to enlist teams to go to South Africa during 1998. A Construction Team was requested for April 16-30, but we will probably have to renegotiate those dates. Other teams requested are as follows: (1) A Construction team of six men for June 11-25, (2) An Evangelism Team of twelve persons for August 3-17, and (3) a Simultaneous Revival Team (preachers and musicians) for sometime in September. Any church that wants an evangelist from South Africa to speak at a 1999 revival should call the associational office.

The 1997 Christmas Toy Ministry was a tremendous success. Approximately 100 volunteers served 159 families or 540 children. Nine persons prayed to receive Christ. Follow-up letters have been mailed to pastors and churches regarding persons and/or families that needed to be referred for enlistment.

The Semi-Annual Meeting will be Monday, April 20, at the First Baptist Church of Spring Hope. The Ephesus Baptist Church will assist. This year's theme is "EACH CHURCH ON MISSION." Registration begins at 3:15 p.m., and the afternoon session at 3:30 p.m. Rev. DuPre Sanders, pastor of the Franklinton Baptist Church, will preach the annual sermon. Supper will be at 5:30 p.m., and the evening session at 6:15 p.m. The program will include Crosswalk (a drama team) and the Royalaires (a singing ensemble from Lake Royale),

We have just received information from the NC Baptist State Convention about a severe famine in North Korea. Churches are urged to fill boxes with food for people in the famine area. Specific instructions are available at the associational office. Churches may fill the boxes and bring them to the associational office.

Richard Morgan suggested that a CCM Report be added to the agenda for the board meetings.

Church and Community Missions Director Gail Nelms reported that she is planning to attend several conferences. She also plans to spend the day with different CCM's in North Carolina to learn hands-on what is being done. Since beginning as the CCM for Tar River she has been mostly involved in training.

Rev. Wallace added that a CCM Director was hired in an effort to have every church involved in hands-on missions. Some ministry possibilities include: a tutorial program, seminary extension classes, conversational Spanish/English classes, and literacy classes. These ministries will be modeled at the associational facility and then moved to the churches.

Luis Maravi, Pastor at the Hispanic Mission, Victory In Christ, reported that average attendance at the mission is over 100 in worship and approximately eighty-four in Sunday School. The mission is in desperate need of space. One person was baptized in March, and one is to be baptized in April. During the winter, five decisions and eight reconciliations were made. In February we started holding Bible

studies in the homes. At the first Bible study, three people were saved. He thanked churches responsible for the health kits, the tracts, and the clothes. A musical concert was held at the Spanish Mission in Wilson. Approximately 300 people attended, sharing music and listening to testimony.

After announcements and prayer requests, the meeting adjourned with prayer by Jody Griffin.

THE REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

The association desperately needs to complete our resource center. More than three years have passed since construction began. By vote of the association, this project was to be a joint effort of all our churches, but not all of our churches have participated. Some have participated only nominally. The following information illustrates participation in the building fund since 1988 -- a ten year period, not just the three years of construction. This information includes our four missions as well as our 46 churches.

4 churches have given nothing.
2 churches have given less than \$100.00.
12 churches have given between \$100.00 and \$500.00.
12 churches have given between \$501.00 and \$1,000.00.
4 churches have given between \$1,001.00 and \$1,500.00.
6 churches have given between \$1,501.00 and \$2,500.00.
5 churches have given between \$3,000.00 and \$4,500.00.
3 churches have given between \$6,200.00 and \$7,300.00.
1 church has given \$9,683.00.
1 church has given \$11,481.00.

Five churches have made additional designated contributions toward specific items or furnishings. These contributions total \$3,142.80. Individuals have contributed \$87,426.68.

We need to move, but before the city will grant an occupancy permit, the grading and graveling must be done. Chairs and tables will be needed for the large conference room, but we could occupy the building before that room is furnished. Most all of the other furnishings have already been acquired.

When the Lord directed Moses to lead the children of Israel into the promised land, He said, "Tell the sons of Israel to go forward . . . then the Egyptians will know that I am the Lord." We need to move ahead and enter our new building. Please help us get this project completed and the building in use for the Master. I challenge each church and mission to consider contributing \$600.00 NOW. We have 50 congregations (46 churches and 4 missions). Some have already given generously, and may feel that they have done their share. A few of our churches may not be able to give \$600.00. My honest opinion is that most can, and in doing so nothing would have to be curtailed in the local church or in other mission causes. I also feel that there are a number of churches that can give more than \$600.00. Doing so will offset those who cannot or will not give.

Keep in mind that the purpose of this building is to provide a training center to train church leaders, and a resource center to make available the best and latest resources (on a cost-free, loan basis). We will be able to provide training opportunities and resources that an individual church might not be able to afford. We want to do all we can to strengthen our churches and help them do the best job possible at the local level. The sooner we can occupy the building, the more effective we can be in ministering throughout the Tar River Baptist Association and around the world. Please help us realize this long-awaited dream.

Proceedings For Fall Session

Held at Harris Chapel Baptist Church Assisted by Mountain Grove and Rock Spring October 19, 1998

AFTERNOON SESSION

Moderator: Adolphus Batchelor Pianist: Joann Wallace

1. The 168th Annual Fall Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Moderator Adolphus Batchelor, Holly Grove Baptist Church.

2. Mr. Doug Mitchell, Harris Chapel, led in singing the hymn "Send the Light."

- 3. Rev. Bill Haley, Harris Chapel Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
- 4. Mr. Batchelor organized the session and appointed Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock Baptist Church, as parliamentarian.
- 5. Vice Moderator DuPre Sanders made a motion that the program be adopted as printed. The vote carried.
- 6. Director of Missions Bill Wallace, Pilot Baptist Church, recognized and welcomed the following new pastors: Paul Tolbert of Peachtree Baptist Church and Jeff Netterville of Castalia Baptist Church.
- 7. Rev. Wallace requested prayer for Rob Lucas, a pastor from South Africa that is visiting our association. He was taken to the hospital with respiratory problems.
- 8. Associational Secretary/Clerk Georgette Guin, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, recognized the twenty-three honor clerks. Rev. Wallace presented each honor clerk with a certificate.
- 9. The histories of the host churches were presented by Rev. Bill Haley, Harris Chapel; Rev. Reiny Koschel, Mountain Grove; and Rev. Carl Poole, Rock Spring.

 10. Mr. Mitchell led in singing the hymn "O Zion, Haste."
- 11. After an introduction by Rev. Wallace, Dr. Clay Warf spoke on behalf of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation. He said the two main responsibilities of the Baptist Foundation is to work with churches in stewardship education and estate planning, and to manage monies and investments wisely.
- 12. Ms. Guin presented the Historian's Report.
- 13. Mr. Gerald Nelms, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, presented the Nominating Committee Report as printed, and made a motion that it be adopted. The vote carried.
- 14. Rev. Wallace led in an installation service for the officers and leaders of the association for the 1998-99 year.
- 15. Mr. Mitchell led in singing the hymn "Jesus Shall Reign."

- 16. Treasurer Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the monthly financial report for September 1998. She said the association was blessed by the giving of the churches and individual members. She expressed appreciation to the churches for their financial support.
- 17. Rev. Wallace presented the proposed budget for 1999. Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church, made a motion that it be adopted. The motion was seconded by Dr. C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church, and the vote carried.
- 18. Mr. Mitchell led in singing the hymn "Ye servants of God."
- 19. Mrs. Wendy Edwards, First Baptist Church, Spring Hope, introduced two new members to the Discipleship Support Team. They are Miss Heather Nelms, Centerville Baptist Church, and Rev. Reiny Koschel, Mountain Grove Baptist Church. Rev. Koschel and his daughter presented a skit. In appreciation for their discipling efforts, awards were presented to Mr. Steve Barham, Rock Spring Baptist Church; Ms. Karen Kelley, Cedar Rock Baptist Church; Dr. Larry William, Louisburg Baptist Church; Dr. C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church; and Ms. Fran Yeakey, Maple Springs Baptist Church. Mrs. Edwards presented a challenge to find someone who is helping people to grow and give them a "Discipleship Award." Blank award certificates were distributed.
- 20. Rev. Wallace reported that Tar River Baptist Association and four other associations were asked to participate in a pilot project. A report will be presented to pastors and other key leaders. This meeting will be on November 5 at Louisburg Baptist Church.
- 21. Church and Community Ministries Director Gail Nelms said that ministry was the center of the life of Jesus. He commissioned us to spread the gospel. If it is impossible or difficult for you to do certain things like go to Africa to minister and spread the gospel, then you can minister and spread the gospel at home. A Mission Ministry guide was compiled after assessments were made and needs discovered. Homemade "M&M" packages were distributed. These included paper "M&M's" with ministry ideas such as buy food for the needy, hold Bible study in the prison, tutor a child, pray for those who go on mission trips, etc. The term "M&M's" is not only for candy, but can also stand for missions and ministry. There are many ways to minister in the name of Jesus.
- 22. Special music was presented by Mr. and Mrs. Terry and Jenny Alford, Ephesus Baptist Church.
- 23. Rev. Wallace explained that the North Carolina Baptist State Convention is in partnership with South Africa. Only two years of the original five-year partnership are left. Each participating association is matched with an association in South Africa. Tar River's partner is the Western Province Baptist Association. Some pastors and laypersons from that association arrived last week and are being hosted by some of our churches. Each South African spoke. Some gave testimonies, some told about their work in South Africa, some shared needs in South Africa, and they all expressed appreciation for our involvement in the partnership.
- 24. Rev. Wallace distributed pill bottles with candy "pills" to overcome "can'titus" These "pills" were to help those who felt the urge to say "I can't" or "not me" when presented with a mission challenge.
- 25. Mr. Batchelor encouraged giving to the Lottie Moon Offering. He said "if you can't go, give so others can."
- 26. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Rev. Koschel.

EVENING SESSION

- 1. The Associational Choir presented special music.
- 2. Moderator Adolphus Batchelor called the meeting to order.
- 3. Mr. Doug Mitchell, Harris Chapel, led in singing the hymn "We've A Story To Tell."
- 4. Brotherhood Director Wayne Gupton, Red Bud Baptist Church, reported that the RA Car Derby was held at the Pilot Fire House in March, and the Track Meet and the Lad/Crusader Congress was held in April. Many RAs enjoyed Camp Caraway. The Basketball League was held. Sixty golfers participated in the Associational Gold Tournament at Hickory meadows. Tar River was represented at the State Baptist Men's Conventions and at Regional meetings. The Medical/Dental van was at the State Missions Rally in August. Two people from the association went to Africa with the State Baptist Men's Sports Mission Team. An Associational team went to South Africa. And finally, several families took in children from Russia.

- 5. Evangelism Council Director Duane Caldwell, Bailey Baptist Church, said that to take the whole gospel to the whole world we must do it by winning one person at a time. He presented a challenge to claim an area and pray for every home in that area.
- 6. Music Council Director Nanette Warren, Pilot Baptist Church, reported that a music conference was held, two hymn sings were held, and caroling was planned in December. In 1999 a handbell workshop is planned.
- 7. Mr. Adolphus Batchelor read the Time, place, and preacher report (see reports following these proceedings.)
- 8. Vacation Bible School Council Director Jenny Alford, Ephesus Baptist church, said that the important part of VBS is not the numbers, but what happens in the lives of children and teachers. She announced the Early Bird Clinic scheduled in April 1999, and the VBS Clinic for all workers scheduled in May. She encouraged churches to elect VBS Directors at the beginning of the year. She requested that each church give the name and address of the VBS Director to the Associational Center. Baptist Sunday School Board materials have improved over the years. The theme for 1999 is "Mount Extreme." The Associational VBS Council wants to help. Call them.
- 9. Woman's Missionary Union Director Kathy Freeman-Robles, Philadelphia Baptist Church, reported that the book studies being planned were not just for WMU members, but for anybody interested. The Day of Prayer will be held in November. Two international mission studies are being planned. Three members of the WMU Leadership Team attended State Resource Training.
- 10. Rev. Wallace led a memorial service that concluded with special music by a group of men from Pilot.
- 11. Rev. Wallace presented the tentative calendar for 1999. A motion to adopt the calendar was made by Mr. Gerald Nelms, Sandy Creek Baptist church. The motion was seconded by Rev. Carl Poole, Rock Spring Baptist church, and the vote carried.
- 12. Rev. Wallace gave his Director of Missions report. We are now in the new building. Pictures and window coverings are needed. The most immediate need is tables and chairs for the big conference room. The chairs are \$35 each and the tables are \$130 each. Rev. Wallace pledged \$105 for three chairs and challenged others to do the same.
- 13. The following people gave testimonies of their mission trip to South Africa: Linda Boulden, Castalia Baptist Church; Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church; Adolphus Batchelor; Holly Grove Baptist Church; Mark Cottrell, Pearce Baptist Church; and Terry Alford, Ephesus Baptist Church.
- 14. Special music was presented by the associational choir directed by Mrs. Robin Brannan, Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church.
- 15. Rev. Joel Ferreira, from South Africa brought the message.
- 16. Mr. Mitchell led in singing the hymn "Send Me, O Lord, Send Me."
- 17. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reporting for the Credentials Committee, said that attendance at the Fall 1998 meeting was as follows: 33 churches and one mission represented by 97 messengers, 9 alternates, 24 pastors, 19 associational officers, and 37 guests for a total of 186 people.
- 18. Rev. Nathan Sawyer, Mount Zion Baptist Church, presented the following resolution and made a motion that they be accepted:

Whereas Harris Chapel Baptist Church, assisted by Mountain Grove Baptist Church and Rock Spring Baptist Church, has hosted Tar River Baptist Association's Semi-Annual Meeting,

And whereas they have provided graciously of God's blessings, fellowship, and food;

The motion was seconded by Rev. Mark Cottrell, Pearce Baptist Church, and the vote carried.

19. The meeting was adjourned in prayer by Rev. Bill Haley, Harris Chapel Baptist Church.

HISTORY OF HARRIS CHAPEL BAPTIST CHURCH

If ever a term aptly described Harris Chapel Baptist Church, it would undoubtably be 'perseverance of the saints.' Since the church was organized in 1890, we have endured much, including destruction by a tornado in 1988. However, the faithful carried on in Christian fellowship. As our Lord Jesus is the Author of eternal salvation, the regenerated body of believers at Harris Chapel rebuilt the church with His guidance. The original building, which served as our house of worship, stood just yards from this existing edifice. In 1969, as the Lord added to the family of believers, we built on this current sight.

As is proudly displayed on our church sign which stands on Route 401, Harris Chapel is Southern Baptist in every sense of the term. We have a strong missions program in the church, in teaching our children of Jesus and of reaching our community with His Gospel. We also supported a full-time missionary to China.

Harris Chapel has been greatly influenced by our pastors, among them Charles Howard, who served the flock here from 1921-1950. Rev. Howard's influence is still felt to this day.

Harris Chapel's focus and mission is to be a Christ-centered, Bible preaching, soul-winning family church. Our pastor is William Haley who has served with us since 1996. Harris Chapel has been part of the Tar River Baptist Association since 1964.

HISTORY OF MOUNTAIN GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

About the year 1895 God began a new work in the rural farming community of Alert. Rev. John Colbert of the White Level Community began preaching once a month in a one room log school building in Alert. Rev. Colbert walked the more than twelve miles from his home on Saturday, preach on Sunday morning, then walk back home. His only pay for preaching once a month was a very small love offering.

A year later, Joseph J. Murray organized a Sunday School in the school building. The preaching and Sunday School arrangement continued until 1900 when Rev. Colbert retired. Within the same year, Rev. G. W. Holmes took up the mantle and continued preaching. He too walked to the church from his home is Epsom. The dedication of these early pastors provided the foundation from which the Mountain Grove Baptist Church emerged in 1901 when it was organized.

The church continued to use the school building until 1902, when the first church building was begun. The labor and materials for the new building were donated by the members of the congregation who were committed to their new church.

In 1904, the congregation wished to enter the Tar River Baptist Association, but did not have enough members to allow that to happen. So, they borrowed a few members from what is now the New Bethel Church, and entered the association at Maple Springs in October of 1904. One of the borrowed members, Frank Edward, later surrendered to the ministry and served as Pastor of the church during the 1920's.

In 1923, God had blessed the young congregation and they had outgrown their existing building. The old building was sold and moved across the street to be used as a store building. During the building period, the church used a three room school building for its services. During this time H.R. Mosley was elected to serve as Sunday School Director, a position which he held for the next forty years and five months.

Once the new building was completed, the church continued to grow. Rev. E.W. Green began as pastor in July of 1936 and served until October of 1953. His seventeen year and two month tenure, was the longest of any pastor to serve at Mountain Grove. In 1952, the Sunday School had grown to the point that its present facilities were once again inadequate. A basement was dug allowing for an additional eleven classrooms, then the existing sanctuary was moved back and placed over the newly constructed basement.

Through the years many improvements have been made to the existing facility. Stained glass windows were added in 1964. In 1968, a parsonage was built just down the road from the sanctuary. IN 1972, the white wood sanctuary building was brick veneered, and an addition was added to the back of the existing sanctuary. In 1980, a fellowship hall was constructed which enhanced the social opportunities of the church.

In recent years, the ministry of Mountain Grove Baptist Church has continued to be blessed by the Lord. In March of 1996, the church voted to hire a part-time youth minister, and in 1997 a scholarship fund was begun to assist church members who were pursuing a post-high school education. We are thankful to the Lord for his

providence during the nearly one-hundred years of ministry. We are grateful to the founders and all who have had a part in establishing this church. To God be the glory!

HISTORY OF ROCK SPRING BAPTIST CHURCH

"We the undersigned members of the Rock Spring Baptist Church, do covenant and agree that we will, to the best of our ability, support and sustain this, the Baptist Church of Christ, upon the Holy Word of God." This covenant began the Rock Spring Baptist Church on April 26, 1874, under a brush arbor. Rock Spring is located in Franklin County, seven miles south of Louisburg on Highway 39.

From a group of thirteen charter members, the membership increased to sixty-one in the first year. The membership is now well over three hundred. Sunday evening small groups include TeamKID for children, youth discipleship, and adult Bible studies such as Firstplace, Experiencing God, and Witnessing Through Your Relationships.

The growth of Franklin County has brought with it a great spiritual responsibility. Our church is committed to reaching as many people as we possibly can with the good news of the gospel of Jesus Christ before it is too late. Rock Spring is a caring, loving, Christ honoring group of believers that seeks to know and do God's will.

Next year, Rock Spring will celebrate its one hundred and twenty-fifth anniversary. We have so much for which we are thankful. We make no claim to a perfect record. Reflecting on a congregation with varying degrees of talents and forty-three different pastors, we may well say as St. Paul did at a certain point on the Appian Way to Rome, "Thank God and take courage."

SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL REPORT

The movement spread rapidly in England and Wales and was introduced in 1785 in the United States. The involvement of businessmen and other laypersons proved to be an asset to the young movement. The organizational skills of business persons provided a structure for Sunday School, which ensured its success. The attention to minute details meant that nothing would be left to chance, and particular care would be appropriated at all times. This ultimately meant that there would be no loss of energy or direction, meaning that people became and remained a priority.

Look at all the dynamics which are still relevant today: involvement of laypersons, structure for success, attention to details, particular care given, channeled energy and direction, and the most important, people are our priority.

Now that you know where we came from, might I be so bold as to ask, "Where are we going?"

I want to thank those of you who participated in our Sunday School Key Leadership Conference and in the Associational Sunday School Training School. I trust that both were positive experiences and beneficial to you. MISSION REPORT: HISPANIC/FRANKLINTON

God's presence is seen each day in the Hispanic Mission at Franklinton as He has brought together a nucleus of faithful members from which to continue to build His Hispanic church there. The members are growing in their knowledge of the Bible and understanding of God through worship services, Bible study, and special fellowships. The mission meets every Sunday at 4:30 pm in the fellowship hall of the Franklinton Baptist Church with attendance ranging from five to fifteen. A Friday night Bible Study begun earlier this year is held each Friday night in one of the member's homes.

Special fellowships which always include a time of worship have been a tool to reach out to the Hispanic in the area. Last fall and this spring several cookouts were held which included fellowship, a devotion, and recreation for all. Attendance at each was approximately twenty-five. In December approximately thirty Hispanics gathered for a special Christmas fellowship which included a time of gift exchange with gifts provided by the WMU of Franklinton Baptist Church. 
CCM Director's Report


The past year has been a year of learning and preparation for me as Church and Community Ministries Director. I attended three training conferences located at Caraway and the Baptist State Convention in Cary. I also prepared groundwork to assist our forty-six churches and four missions develop ministries to reach people with the good news of Jesus Christ.

The Christmas Toy Ministry was a unique and rewarding experience. Ninety-two volunteers enthusiastically and lovingly served 159 families. The children numbered 452 with additional children referred from the Department of Social Services and

Safe Space. There were nine professions of faith!

Last spring we conducted a community needs assessment which yielded the following information: an awareness of resources available to meet needs in our

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the Semi-Annual Meeting in April 1998. Both meetings were held at Duke Memorial Baptist Church.

June 29, 1998

Moderator for the session was Adolphus Batchelor. Thirty-nine people were present, representing fifteen churches. Epp Catlett was appointed as Parliamentarian. The following new pastors were recognized: Jerry Boyd, Philadelphia, and Jeff Netterville, Castalia.

WMU Leadership Team Director Kathy Freeman reported that the Leadership Team met in May. Nine members of the team will be attending training at Caraway in July. The WMU Fall Workshop at Oak Grove in September will feature a presentation by Wendy Edwards. Help is needed with refreshments during Vacation Bible School at Victory in Christ on July 13-17. Gift certificates were given to the associational staff during Associational Missions Week. The State Missions Rally will be held August 30 at Oak Grove. Rev. Yinka Jolocso, First African Baptist Church in Raleigh, and his wife Ruth, will be the guest speakers. The Disaster Relief Van from the NC Baptist State Convention will be on display and will serve a meal after the rally. Several members of the Leadership Team are taking part in the Volunteer Connection Program through the National WMU. The WMU requested that the Associational Council recommend to the Board that these women be approved as mission volunteers. Associational approval is a requirement of the program. The Volunteer Connection Program is an opportunity for involvement in mission projects in the United States or around the world. Volunteers receive six months of training through book studies.

Finance Committee Chairman Jimmie Weathers presented the monthly financial report for May.

Discipleship Support Team Member Carl Poole reported that several leaders from the association attended the State Key Leadership Conference at Caswell. Team Member Jody Griffin resigned because he accepted a call to be pastor of a church in King's Mountain.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren reported that sixty-seven attended the Choral Workshop in May. Those attending will form a choir to sing at the Associational Fall Meeting.

Dr. C. Ray Pruette gave a report on the Hispanic Mission sponsored by the Franklinton Baptist Church. On June 28, the members of both the church and the mission got together for a social and softball game. After the fellowship and game, Rev. Grady Nowell presented a devotion in Spanish, and Rev. DuPre Sanders presented one in English. A meal followed the devotion. Approximately 100 attended the day's activities.

Adolphus Batchelor presented the Council Report which consisted of two recommendations.

Recommendation #1: The Associational Council recommends to the Board that the Association approve the following women for mission volunteer work through the Volunteer Connection Program: Kathy Freeman-Robles, Georgette Guin, Debbie Johnson, Elaine Lewis, Debbie Marks, Heather Nelms, and Nanette Warren.

Recommendation #2: The Associational Council recommends to the Board that the Sims Baptist Church be approved by the Association to borrow money from the NC Baptist State Convention.

Votes passed on both recommendations.

Church and Community Missions Director Gail Nelms reported that she attended a CCM seminar at Caraway in April and training for new CCM's at the NC Baptist State

Convention in May. She spoke at the Minister's Conference at Harris Chapel and at Bethlehem Baptist Church during a morning worship service. She stated that her primary function as the CCM Director is to give assistance to the churches in developing ministries to reach people for Christ and to assist congregations to be mission outposts for their communities. Mrs. Nelms conducted a community needs assessment which revealed resources available to meet needs in the area and specific areas of need that are not being met.

Georgette Guin read the written report sent by Director of Missions Bill Wallace, who was absent due to a myogram received that day. His report indicated the need for donations to purchase tables and chairs for the new building. He extended an invitation to join a mission team going to South Africa August 3-18. He also encouraged attendance at the State Mission Rally to be held August 30 at Oak Grove.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Epp Catlett.

September 28, 1998

Moderator for the session was Adolphus Batchelor. Forty-two people were present, representing sixteen churches. Epp Catlett was appointed as Parliamentarian.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton encouraged volunteers to help with the Associational Christmas Toy Ministry. He announced that Baptist Men's Day and the State Baptist Men's Convention will be in January 1999.

Discipleship Support Team Member Heather Nelms reported that Carl Poole will be facilitating a book study for ministers on October 12. Some plans made by the team for 1999 include the annual deacon event, a conference for women, and a Ministry Action Workshop.

Finance Committee Chairman Jimmie Weathers presented the monthly financial report for August.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren reported that Hymn Sings in September were held at Cedar Rock and Ephesus. A choir made up of people throughout the association will sing at the Annual Fall Meeting of the Association on October 19.

Bill Wallace, reporting for Sunday School Council Director David Averette, said

an Associational Sunday School Training School was held on September 24.

Georgette Guin, reporting for WMU Leadership Team Director Kathy Freeman, said that the Leadership Team stored the WMU records in the new associational building on August 15, and voted for them not to be removed from the building. On August 17, there were twenty-one participants in the WMU Associational Key Leadership Conference. On September 8, there were fifty-four participants at the Fall Workshop at Oak Grove. On August 30, an offering was received at the Associational State Missions Rally for the First African Church in the amount of \$198.68. The Volunteer Connection Book Studies begin on September 29 at Pilot at 7 pm, and will be led by Elaine Lewis. The dates and leaders for the other book studies are as follows:

October 22 at Rocky Cross, led by Joann Wallace;

November 19 at the associational building, led by Kathy Robles and Betty Barham;

December 15 at Flat Rock, led by Mildred Thompson;

January 28 at a place to be announced, led by Linda Hicks. The annual WMU dues are \$2.00 per adult member and are due by October 1. The Association-wide International Mission Studies will be led by Peggy Boyd of Philadelphia Baptist Church. Studies will begin at 7 pm on November 8 at Duke Memorial Baptist Church, and on November 16 at Bunn Baptist Church. It is requested that each church WMU donate \$80 for the Christmas Prison Ministry. On December 4, WMU members will meet at Rocky Cross at 7 pm to pack the boxes. On December 5, those who are registered will go to the prison at 9 am to hold a party for the inmates, and to give out the boxes.

Rev. Wallace gave reports on the missions as follows:

 $\underline{\text{Damascus Road}}$ - Five people were recently baptized. The youth program has begun again. They now have a pianist.

 $\underline{\text{Lake Royale}} \text{ - Worship services are held every Sunday morning. In } \\ \text{October a guest preacher from South Africa will conduct the very first revival held at the mission.} \\$

 $\frac{\text{Victory in Christ}}{\text{Maravi, has resigned.}} \text{ The mission has adopted a budget for 1999.} \text{ The mission pastor, Luis Maravi, has resigned.} \text{ The interim pastor is John Jones from the NC Baptist State Convention.}$

Gary McNair asked about tables and chairs for the new associational building. Rev. Wallace reported that the money for eighty-three more chairs and ten more tables is needed. The chairs are \$35 each and the tables are \$130 each.

Mr. Weathers presented the proposed budget for 1999. He made a motion to approve the proposed budgetand send it on to the annual meeting with an increase added to keep the secretary's retirement commensurate with her salary increase. The motion was seconded by Jeff Netterville, and the vote carried.

Church and Community Missions Director Gail Nelms reported that in July she had the opportunity to speak to ninety new teachers joining the Franklin County School System. She informed them of our interest in the children in our church communities and our desire to be available to help. Mrs. Nelms will be mailing letters to each church, asking that a missions coordinator be selected who will be responsible for the following: sharing information from the association with the pastor, staff, other missions leaders, and the membership; sharing the needs, available resources, and ministries of their particular church with the associational office; helping plan missions ministries; and helping recruit volunteers for these ministries. A coordinator is essential to cooperatively accomplish our missions goals. Mrs. Nelms has prepared a mission ministry resource guide and a manual for senior adult ministries.

Rev. Wallace presented the tentative calendar for 1999. Gary McNair made a motion to accept the tentative calendar and pass it on to the Annual Meeting. Macon Barham seconded the motion, and the vote carried.

Rev. Wallace announced that the theme for the Annual Meeting will be "The Whole Church Taking the Whole Gospel to the Whole World." Scheduled to be on the program are preachers from South Africa and Dr. Clay Warf from the Baptist Foundation. The Annual Fall Meeting will be held on October 19 at the Harris Chapel Baptist Church. Registration will begin at 3:15 pm.

Rev. Wallace announced that the associational staff is now working in the new office building. Things still needed include: pictures, tables, chairs, a sign,

shrubbery, a fence, and grass.

He reported that during August 4-18, three teams ministered in South Africa. During October 16-29 Tar River will host seven visitors from South Africa. The churches committed to hosting these visitors are Castalia, Cedar Rock, Holly Grove, Lake Royale Mission, Peachtree, Pearce, Perry's Chapel, Poplar Spring, and Spring Hope.

He encouraged messengers to attend the Annual Fall Meeting on October 19, at Harris Chapel, assisted by Rock Spring and Mountain Grove. He announced that churches planning to participate in the basketball league should have a representative at the organizational meeting on November 7, at 8 am at the Murphy House Restaurant. He concluded his report by urging churches to send messengers to the annual meeting of NC Baptist State Convention November 9-11, in Winston-Salem.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Gordon Joyner.

(outstanding achievements for 1997-98)

 ${\tt BAILEY}$ - Our RAs went to camp for the first time. We hosted the "Evangels" from the NC Baptist State Convention.

BETHLEHEM - We began a TeamKID Program. Our new church building should be completed by December 1998. A Child Dedication Service was held for three babies. The youth group attended Caswell.

BEULAH CHRISTIAN - We began Sunday School at Hillside Nursing Home in Wake Forest. A part-time Church Secretary was hired. We joined the NC Adopt a Clean Highway Program, and keep the sides of Highway 96 to Flower's Crossroads clean. Many landscaping projects were conducted. S 100.00 CARDS (BIRTHDAY, ANNIVERSARY, AND SYMPATHY): Cards will be sent to each minister and each member of his family on the occasions of birthdays, anniversaries, and bereavement. \$ 1,200.00 CCM TRAVEL REIMBURSEMENT: The CCM Director is reimbursed for all business travel up to a maximum of \$1200 annually. Consideration will also be given to those who have served significantly in the past. NEW EQUIPMENT: Allocated funds in this line item will be 500.00 used for the purchase of new equipment. All purchases will be made only with the approval of the Finance Committee. \$ 1,200.00 OFFICE SUPPLIES: Budget will provide funds for the necessary supplies to adequately do the work of the association. \$ 1,639.22 PAYROLL TAXES: Budget provides the association's portion of Social Security taxes for the Secretary (\$1,109.46) and the CCM Director (\$529.76). \$ 50.00 PETTY CASH: Twenty-five dollars is kept in the office to cover returned mail and other incidentals. The Secretary keeps receipts on all petty cash expenditures and is responsible for reconciling the petty cash fund. \$ 2,400.00 POSTAGE: Postage will be provided for promotional mailings, other correspondence, and a few copies of "CURRENTS OF THE TAR." \$ 4,000.00 PRINTING: "CURRENTS OF THE TAR," letterheads, envelopes, and other printed forms and materials are essential to the work of the association. \$ 175.00 SECRETARY'S TRAINING: Budget provides registration fees for conferences and clinics the secretary is to attend. \$ 3,000.00 TELEPHONE AND INTERNET SERVICE: Budget provides telephones to facilitate the work of the association. The internet makes e-mail available, and provides a wealth of helpful and useable information. \$ 6,000.00 UTILITIES: These funds will be used to pay for electricity, water, and fuel for the Associational Center.

 tremendous spiritual growth Christians can and do experience
 through service to others, as well as the unlimited outreach
 potential it provides. Practical ideas for implementation
 will be communicated. Budget will provide for speaker
 honorarium and travel, promotion, special features, meals,
 etc. Neighboring associations are being invited to join in
 sponsoring this event.
- ASSOCIATIONAL BIBLE DRILL & CELEBRATION: An associational drill will be provided for children (grades 4 6), youth (grades 7 9), and Youth Speakers' Tournament (grades 10 12). The tournament will be followed by a "Celebration of Learning" in which children will be treated to a special meal and surprises, and leaders will be recognized. The goal of the celebration will be to help the Drill and Speaker participants see that learning is reason to be

joyful and to celebrate God's work in our lives. Budget will provide for drill and celebration supplies, food, and associational recognition of participants and leaders. This event will be held on March 27.

- \$ 225.00 DISCIPLESHIP PROJECTS: Specific discipling projects will be determined according to needs expressed in the strategy meetings. Budget will provide the means to conduct various projects as then outlined. As many projects as possible will be conducted according to time and resources.
- \$ 60.00 ASSOCIATIONAL DISCIPLESHIP UPDATE: Associational leaders will be trained in the latest resources and discipling tools available to enable them to share intelligently with churches. Budget will provide registration fee for this annual event to be held on August 20 and 21.
- \$ 300.00 DISCIPLING RESOURCES FOR ASSOCIATIONAL LIBRARY: Various resources of a discipling nature will be purchased and placed in the associational resource center to be available for churches to check out for use. The purpose is to help facilitate quality discipling experiences in a day and age when the cost of videos, leader guides, and other tools are sometimes cost prohibitive.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION:

- \$ 300.00 WMU SPRING MEETING: This annual event is a time of reporting and reflecting on the past year's work, and promoting and hi-lighting the work of the new year. New officers are installed, fellowship is enjoyed, and inspiration and challenge are woven into the program. This meeting will be held at Beulah on April 6.
- \$ 50.00 WMU LEADERSHIP TRAINING: These funds will help defray the cost of registration for the Associational WMU Leadership Team to receive Associational WMU Training offered by the state at Caraway, July 16-17.
- \$ 100.00 WMU LITERATURE: These funds will provide resources such as the Dimension magazine, year books, and guidebooks for members of the Associational WMU Leadership Team to use in planning.

BROTHERHOOD:

- \$ 150.00 TRAINING FOR BROTHERHOOD AND RA LEADERS: This training will be offered at the Key Leadership Conference, scheduled for August 16, 1999. These funds will provide honorariums for the facilitators of this training.
- \$ 300.00 ROYAL AMBASSADOR BASKETBALL: This program is basically self-supporting, but balls, score books, and other incidentals are needed to carry on this ministry. Play is on Saturdays during the months of January, February, and March, 1999.
- \$ 150.00 ROYAL AMBASSADOR CAR DERBY: Trophies will be awarded to the first and second place winners in the Lad and Crusader Divisions of competition. Trophies will also be awarded for "Best Car Design" and "Best Missions Project." The Derby is on the calendar for March 13, 1999.

\$ 200.00 ROYAL AMBASSADOR TRACK MEET: Ribbons are awarded to first, second, and third place winners in each event. A trophy is awarded to the church that earns the highest number of total team points. This event is set for Saturday, May 1, 1999 at Southern Nash High School.

MUSIC:

- \$ 75.00 HYMN SINGS: The major thrusts of these events are to promote fellowship, enjoy singing the hymns of our faith, and acquaint the people of the Association with hymns they do not know or have not been singing. Hymn Sing I is scheduled for September 19, 1999. Hymn Sing II is scheduled for September 26, 1999.
- \$ 150.00 CHORAL CLINIC: The purpose of this clinic is to strengthen the music ministry of the churches of the TRBA. The date for this event is May 13, 1999. It is designed to offer help for Music Directors, instrumentalists, and Choir Members.
- \$ 100.00 HANDBELL WORKSHOP: This workshop, to be conducted on February 16, 1999, will help sharpen the skills of those already using handbells. It will also provide a "hands on" experience for churches considering the use of handbells. Budgeted funds will provide an honorarium for the workshop leader.
- \$ 100.00 EASTER CANTATA: Choirs from all churches within the association will be invited to learn, rehearse, and participate in an Easter Cantata. These funds will provide for some materials and an honorarium for the conductor.
- \$ 50.00 SIGHT READING CLASS: A class for choir members and others interested in learning to sight-read music will be held on June 24. Budgeted funds will provide a small honorarium for the leader.

YOUTH MINISTRIES:

\$ 400.00 YOUTH EVENTS: The Youth Council will plan and conduct youth events during 1999. This funding will be used to provide leadership for these events. Should additional funds be needed, they will have to be secured through youth projects or by requiring participants to help defray the costs associated with these events. Dates and details of events are to be announced later.

EVANGELISM:

- \$ 150.00 EVANGELISM TRAINING: A training opportunity will be offered for pastors and laity. The time and place will be announced later. Budgeted funds will provide an honorarium for the trainer.
- \$ 250.00 MAPPING FOR EVANGELISM TRAINING: This is a tool to help churches focus their outreach efforts. It provides a way to locate people so that a church member near the prospect can make a contact. This tool enables a church visitor to know such things as the age, marital status, ethnic origin, and other helpful information about an individual BEFORE a visit is made. An association with this software can coordinate the efforts of several churches to reach every person in that association with the Gospel message. Budgeted funds cover the cost of the software.

- \$ 500.00 YOUTH EVANGELISM EVENT: This event will feature music that appeals to youth, and an evangelist who can speak their language. Tentative dates are August 6-7, 1999. Funds will cover expenses and honorariums of program personalities.
- \$ 500.00 JESUS VIDEO DISTRIBUTION: This video, purchased with these budgeted funds, will be distributed by the association's Evangelism Council at a time and place to be determined.

MEDIA:

- \$ 1,000.00 RESOURCES: The Media Center should provide resources for every phase of church programming. We need to build a wealth of media resources to enhance and strengthen the work of the churches. Such needed resources include new books, audio-visual materials, and supplies to catalog and maintain all associational owned media and media equipment. Through a Cooperative Agreement the NC Baptist State Convention will provide \$800 towards this amount.
- \$ 150.00 MEDIA CONFERENCE: A qualified consultant will conduct the conference on June 26, 1999 at the associational center.

 These funds will be used to defray costs associated with this conference.

KEY LEADERSHIP CONFERENCES:

- \$ 200.00 STATE KEY LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE: The Key Leaders of the TRBA will attend this training event at the NC Baptist Assembly, Fort Caswell. Budget will provide gasoline and meals while in route to and from Caswell. Lodging will be provided by the NC Baptist State Convention of. The dates are May 3-4, 1999.
- ASSOCIATIONAL KEY LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE: Key leaders from the churches of the association will be invited to attend this annual event. Separate conferences will be conducted for the following: Sunday School Directors, Discipleship Training Directors, WMU Directors, Baptist Men and RA Directors, Music Directors, Pastors and Evangelism Leaders, Finance Leaders, Youth, and Church Clerks. The funds in this item will be used to provide travel and honorarium for a special guest speaker. The date of this conference is August 16, 1999.

ANNUAL AND SEMI-ANNUAL MEETINGS:

- \$ 500.00 SEMI-ANNUAL SPRING MEETING: This annual event will be held on Monday, April 19 at a place to be announced. Funds will be needed for necessary supplies and special speakers.
- \$ 500.00 ANNUAL FALL MEETING: This annual event will take place on Monday, October 18 at a place to be announced. Funds will be needed for necessary supplies and special speakers.
- \$ 10,230.00 Sub-total of Church Development and Christian Ministries
- IV. DIRECT MISSION MINISTRIES: Many people in our area are in need of special ministry. No one church can minister to all of their needs. Our direct mission ministries make it possible to involve many of our churches in "giving a cup of cold water" in Jesus' name. As we meet needs we bear witness of the love of God in Christ Jesus.
 - -0- LAKE ROYALE: Volunteers conduct services at Lake Royale each Sunday. This work is self-supporting.

- -0- BUNN PRISON: Sunday services are conducted each week of every other month. All of this work is done by volunteers.
- -0- LOUISBURG MANOR: Volunteers conduct services each Friday for the residents of this facility.
- -O- CHRISTMAS TOY MINISTRY: Churches of the Association provide toys and other items to be used to assist needy families at Christmas. Volunteers will conduct this ministry of care and evangelism during the month of December.
- -O- LOCAL MISSIONS: A ministry to assist persons in crisis or critical need.
- \$ 200.00 DIAPER CHANGE AND CUP OF COLD WATER MINISTRY: A tent or booth will be set up for mothers to change the diapers of their children. We will also make cold water available. Volunteers will be available to offer Bibles, tracts, and information about the Tar River Baptist Association. Functions where this ministry will be performed include Louisburg's Tar River Festival (September 18), and Spring Hope's Pumpkin Festival (October 2).
- \$ 8,000.00 HISPANIC MINISTRY (FRANKLINTON): The budgeted amount is a contribution toward the salary for the Pastor of the mission. Through a Cooperative Agreement, the NC Baptist State Convention will provide \$4,000 of this budgeted amount.
- \$ 7,600.00 HISPANIC MINISTRY (VICTORY IN CHRIST): The budgeted amount is a contribution toward the salary for the Hispanic pastor. Through a Cooperative Agreement, the NC Baptist State Convention will provide \$3,600 of this amount (to be paid in monthly installments).
- \$ 1,800.00 DAMASCUS ROAD BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP: The Baptist State
 Convention provides these funds which are used to assist
 with the rental cost of the Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship
 worship facility and to supplement the pastor's salary.

- V. NEW WORK/NEW CHURCH STARTS: Funds will be set aside for the purchase of property for new work or new churches in targeted areas of the Association. Studies and/or surveys will be conducted to determine the need for a new work/church in a given area.
 - \$ 1,200.00 DESIGNATED ACCOUNT FOR NEW WORK: \$100.00 will be taken monthly from the Regular Account and deposited into the Designated Account to be held for the purchase of property in areas where new work needs to begin.

VI. PARTNERSHIPS:

- \$ 1,850.00 SOUTH AFRICA: During the years of this partnership the association will send one person or assist several persons who want to participate in a project but cannot do so without financial assistance. Some of these funds may also be used for project materials.
- \$ 1,000.00 STATESIDE: These funds will be used when our association is requested to partner with another association or church somewhere in the USA to provide assistance with construction, building repairs, disaster cleanup, training,

or other specialized help. These monies may be used to assist people who want to participate or with other costs associated with specific projects.

- \$ 2,850.00 Sub-total of Partnerships
- VII. PERSONNEL EXPENSES: The on-going, day-to-day planning, administration, coordination, and office work of the Association lends support to all associational ministries. There is also necessary custodial and grounds maintenance of the associational building and property.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Her voice steady and quite, Christy delivers her personal story like a letter dropped into an anonymous mailbox at a shuttered house on a nameless street.

Her grandparents' murder had unleashed memories of her own abuse. Family members encouraged her to leave her home and repeatedly told her she Was worthless.

"I've had a rough life," she says. "I've been through about anything I can possibly go through."

Christy admits carrying a short fuse and outbursts, physical abuse and a dangerous living situation brought her to Mills Home in November 1997.

She continues her quiet story about coming to Mills Home, about doing well in school, and tutoring two residents in Alumni Cottage. She's glad she can help, because

"learning comes easy to me, and I want to help someone if I can."

Julie, her first child care worker at Mills Home, became a real friend who "helped me turn my life around," Christy says, her face at last beginning to brighten. "She was there for me when I needed somebody. My parents weren't there. Nobody wanted me. It was fun being around Julie. She showed me she cared about me and that I could be loved."

Julie couldn't realize how important her friendship was, or how close Christy came to giving up. Christy admits to two suicide attempts, and believed she would never see age 16.

"I used to dread getting up," she said. "I didn't know if I would get my mouth

busted or my arm broke."

Even now, there are days Christy doesn't want to get out of bed. But she does, and she goes to school and earns mostly "A"s and stars on the varsity basketball team, and tutors other residents in math, and went to New York for a summer basketball tournament and is planning to attend college to study a helping profession.

Now she is planning to live, not planning to die. BCH is giving her opportunities

to live for.

Christy's story is repeated hundreds of times each year at BCH. Not all are as dramatic but every one tells of a young person and a family at the end of an unraveling rope.

At four residential campuses, two homes for behaviorally troubled girls, a maternity home, a home for teenage mothers and their babies, therapeutic camping and

model day care, 1,560 young people found help in troubled times last year.

During the past year BCH received \$1.6 million through the Cooperative Program, and \$752,000 through the Thanksgiving Offering. Total church gifts of \$3.3 million comprised 18 percent of the nearly \$18 million in revenue. Because of a positive investment environment, BCH investments of endowment funds provided 33 percent of revenue.

Two major priorities of the \$10.1 million "Light Their Way" Campaign were

dedicated: The Winifred Lindsay Education/ Administrative Center at Odum Home in Pembroke on Jan. 20, and the John D. and Amelia W. Johnson Cottage at Mills Home on May 12.

U.S. Congressman Mike McIntyre, co-chair of the Congressional Task Force for Responsible Fatherhood, spoke at the dedication of the Lindsay Center. He said BCH has the "purpose, people and passion" to successfully help children and families turn their lives around."

"We realize when we reach out to our children we're making the best investment for tomorrow we could ever make for our country," he said.

Winifred Lee Herbert Lindsay, for whom the Lindsay Center is named, died Nov. 21, 1997.

Primary funds for building Johnson Cottage were given by Phil and Sharon Drake, of Franklin, in memory of Sharon's father and in honor of her mother, a BCH trustee.

"God has given me more than I deserve," Drake said in a brief, emotional address at the dedication. He said giving money to build the cottage was the "easy part" compared to the cottage worker's task of making a difference in children's lives.

Michael C. Blackwell celebrated his 15th anniversary as president of BCH on July 1. 1998.

The video, "A Long Walk Home" is available to promote the 1998 Thanksgiving Offering, which has a statewide goal of \$800,000, the largest ever.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The mission of the NC Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in generating endowment to enhance their permanent financial support. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased individual collective financial support. The Baptist Foundation is committed to assisting individual church members through creative stewardship methods to provide permanent financial undergirding of these ministries.

As of December 31, 1997, the Foundation held \$72,432,412 under management. In 1997, \$3,473,850 was distributed to Baptist work and \$1,542,473 was distributed to individuals for a total distribution of \$5,016,323.

the income distributions for the entire 78-year history of the NC Baptist Foundation totals: \$12,475,237 income paid to individuals and \$19,533,109 to Baptist churches, institutions, and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$32,008,346.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Hospital Celebrates 75 Years of Service

In May 1998 the NC Baptist Hospitals, Inc. celebrated 75 years of service to the community and the region. During these years the hospital has been faithful to the vision of the NC Baptist State Convention when the hospital was birthed: to extend the healing ministry which was demonstrated by Jesus Christ. Many challenges have been faced through the years, but the commitment to compassionately strive for innovative excellence has remained the same.

Baptist Benevolent Care Fund

Baptist churches from all across NC joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the NC Baptist State Convention in 1924. In 1997 the MDO amounted to \$500,747. It was used exclusively to help patients who had little or no health care insurance or no other financial means to pay their hospital bills. From the offering this past year, well over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our Baptist churches in North Carolina. May God bless all those who supported us with prayers and gave so generously. Division of Pastoral Care

During the year the chaplains and staff of the Pastoral Care Department provide worship services in Davis Memorial Chapel on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday for patients and family members. The Pastoral Care Department staff supervised 64 students during the year and made more than 53,000 ministry contacts.

The Department of Pastoral Counseling, CareNet, Inc. continues to expand its ministries. There are now 13 Christian counseling centers located in strategic areas across the state. During the year these professionally staffed centers will provide

over 26,000 hours of counseling.

The Center for Congregational Health, Inc. continued to expand its mission of helping congregations become healthier communities of faith. Programs and assistance offered to churches include: Consultation, Intentional Interim Ministry, and Leadership development. Resources for ministers include: Young Leaders Program, Turning Point, Interim Ministry Training, and Intentional Interim Ministry Training. Facts About Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center

With more than 10,000 employees, four restaurants, two banks, and a post office that handles more mail than some towns, the Medical Center has been called a city-

within-a-city.

The Medical Center successfully proposed to Forsyth County Commissioners to purchase the county's indigent health care clinic, Reynolds Health Center. The Center also serves as a primary care training facility for our medical students and residents. Construction is expected to begin in the spring on a \$5 million, state-of-the-art facility.

Building strong relationships with community hospitals and other academic medical centers was a hallmark of the past year. Hospital and clinical affiliations grew to

22 by December 1997.

Points of Emphasis and Progress

ALS CENTER - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center has opened a specialized center to provide coordinated care for patients with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), often referred to as Lou Gehrig's disease. The Medical Center's ALS program is the only center in western NC devoted to ALS patients.

TRAUMA CENTER - The Medical Center has the designated Level I trauma center for northwest NC. In the trauma center our goal is for the patient who needs surgery to be in the operating room 10 minutes after arriving at the Emergency Department. Surgeons, anesthesiologists and staff remain on duty 24 hours a day to handle such emergencies.

TOPS IN RESEARCH - According to a report in the February 1997 issue of Applied Clinical Trials, Wake Forest University School of Medicine ranked in the top 10 US clinical research institutions.

RANKED AMONG THE NATION'S BEST - The NC Baptist Hospitals, Inc. is among the nation's best hospitals in nine of 17 specialities, according to rankings published in the July

1998 issue of US News & World Report.

NEW HEART VALVE - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center is one of the first centers in the country to offer a new "natural" valve replacement to patients with diseased or damaged aortic heart valves. the Freestyle valve was tested extensively in six centers--including Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center--before being released for general use.

NEWEST TREATMENT FOR EPILEPSY - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center offers a new treatment for epilepsy--a "pacemaker for the brain" that can help control seizures in patients who are not helped by medication and are ineligible for surgery. It is a joy for the Christian Action League of North Carolina to serve the churches of this great state. We continue to work to inform the Christian community about the moral issues that face our state and nation. Our goal is to address these issues with the principles of God's Word, the cornerstone of truth.

A. Christian Values

It was the pleasure of the Christian Action League to be one of the sponsors of the Third Annual Christian Heritage Week of NC held March 15-22. The League encouraged schools, churches, and communities to recognize, commemorate and learn about the Christian heritage and history of our nation. CAL sponsored a state-wide essay contest for high school students (public, private, and home schools) and presented state winners with awards for excellence.

CAL continued to promote Christian citizenship throughout the churches and communities of our state. CAL has distributed over 12,000 copies of the Ten Commandments to churches businesses, schools and homes across NC. Promoted Sanctity

of Human Life Sunday and the National Day of Prayer statewide.

Held a Church Leadership Legislative Day on June 23. The purpose of this day was to have pastors and church leaders come together and enjoy fellowship, meet and hear some of our legislators and become more aware of how state government and the legislative process works.

B. Gambling

Lottery proponents continue in their efforts to bring a state-sponsored lottery to North Carolina. CAL monitors these efforts and updates the Christian community on lottery information through letters, calls, and our fax and electronic mail networks. Lawmakers have continued to receive a barrage of communications from across the state saying that the lottery is a bad bet for NC.

CAL also monitored the work of the Legislative Study Committee on Bingo

regulations.

C. <u>Sex Education</u>

CAL worked with other Christian and pro-family groups to see that the state mandate for Abstinence Until Marriage education is implemented state-wide. Also, we supported efforts to insure that federal grant money designated to promote abstinence education was used properly. We informed citizens and legislators concerning attempts to fund school-based clinics in NC schools.

D. Abortion

CAL promoted HB 303 (Ban Partial Birth Abortion), HB 536 (Woman's Right to Know Before Abortion) and HB 594 (Fetus Death form Criminal Act). We also encouraged lawmakers to maintain funding reductions and restrictions on the state abortion fund. These sections have resulted in only two qualifying abortions being paid with taxpayers funds in the last two years.

E. Alcohol

CAL monitored all legislation concerning alcohol and other drugs. We successfully supported efforts to strengthen DWI laws, and assisted communities in organizing committees to fight alcohol and drug use. We worked to defeat legislation that would have approved alcohol sales without the vote of the people. CAL also provided awareness, education, and resource materials related to substance abuse problems to churches, communities, etc.

CAL will host a national conference in September of the American Council on

Alcohol Problems.

F. Pornography

We promoted and saw ratified SB 452-Local Regulation of Adult Establishments. This legislation give more authority to local communities to regulate and control adult entertainment establishments.

G. Homosexuality

CAL supports efforts to strengthen the traditional family and continues to monitor and inform the public about the activities of those who promote the radical homosexual agenda. The league successfully lobbies against legislation that would have made homosexuality legal in NC. We offered the video "On Wings Like Eagles," the testimony of deliverance from homosexuality by Michael Johnston of Kerruso Ministries.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

The Council on Christian Higher Education was founded by the Convention in 1944. It was established to assist colleges and churches within the Convention. The Council does not exercise any authority over the Baptist colleges. The competent leadership of trustees, administrators, and faculty guide them as they fulfill their missions. It does, however, study and recommend to the General Board in matters related to Baptist colleges and the Baptist State Convention.

Four men have led the Council as its Executive Director. Claude Gaddy served as The Council's founding leader. Harold Cole served briefly. Ben Fisher succeeded him. T. Robert Mullinax joined the Council in 1971. Mullinax retired this year from the post he has faithfully guided for 27 years.

The Council and Executive Committee of the General Board invited Wayne D. Wike to become the Council's fifth leader. Wike comes to his post from the pastorate. He has served four North Carolina churches as pastor.

He and his wife, Debbie, are alumni of Gardner-Webb University. In addition, he is a graduate of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and Union Theological Seminary.

Wike has already served NC Baptists in a number of ways. He served on the Committee on Committees, Chaired the Committee on Nominations, and Chaired the General Board Membership Study Committee.

Council members have greatly assisted each one of these leaders through the years. The college presidents, provosts, and chairmen of Boards of Trustees, along with an equal number of General Board members, serve as members of the Council.

The strength of the Council lies in its voluntary concept of community rather than competition. The Council has proven to be a mediating influence in relating the colleges to each other, to the church, and to the Convention.

The Council is currently involved in strategy planning. It is seeking to prepare for the new millennium. The future holds great promise. the Council and its member colleges want to be prepared for it. The Baptist churches in NC will benefit as a result.

BYLAWS of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc.

PREAMBLE

For the declaration of its fundamental purposes and the permanent guidance and control of its activities, this body does adopt the following as its Bylaws, to wit: ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Corporation to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches; and to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Corporation. ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. There shall be two (2) classes of membership in the Corporation: voting and non-voting. The non-voting membership shall be composed of all of the members of the churches affiliated with the Corporation. Voting members of the Corporation shall be known as messengers and shall be elected annually by each of the individual churches affiliated with the Corporation in accordance with the Each church is entitled to four (4) messengers. Any church following schedule: whose resident membership exceeds two hundred (200) is entitled to two (2) additional messengers per one hundred (100) members (or major fraction thereof) in excess of two hundred (200). No church shall be entitled to more than ten (10) messengers.

SECTION 2. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the

Corporation shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The Corporation shall meet bi-annually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session. ARTICLE IV - RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE CORPORATION

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Corporation by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator and the Director of Missions shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES OF THE CORPORATION

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the Corporation by filing the Annual Church Profile; to send messengers to the bi-annual meetings of the Corporation; to give full statistical information and also facts concerning their general welfare; and to send contributions to pay the expenses of the Corporation. The Corporation secretary (known as the Clerk) shall furnish the churches with the necessary printed forms and/or software for their Annual Church Profiles. These materials are to be distributed to the churches at least six (6) weeks before the Annual Fall session of the Corporation. The churches are requested to have the Church Profiles in the hands of the Clerk not less than two weeks before the fall meeting of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE CORPORATION

SECTION 1. The Corporation shall have no right to infringe upon the sovereignty of rights of churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

SECTION 2. The Corporation may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that treats with contempt the purposes and requirements of the Corporation, or that applies for its own dismissal. The Corporation may also dissolve connection with any church that does not file a Church Profile or have messengers attending its Annual Fall Meetings for two (2)

consecutive years.

ARTICLE VII - OFFICERS

The officers of the Corporation shall be: Director of Missions, Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Trustees.

ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to lead the Corporation to fulfill its mission faithfully, effectively, and lovingly. His role is three-dimensional: (1) mission strategist, (2) minister to the churches, pastors, and other church staff members, and (3) general leader of the Corporation. Within the limits of his time and ability, he is to respond to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Corporation.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Clerk (also known as the Secretary) to provide administrative support services to the Director of Missions and to the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. It shall also be the duty of the Clerk to record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the bi-annual meetings and of the Executive Board, and to make this information available on request. The Clerk shall use all diligence to have the record of transactions printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible; and to distribute to the church clerks reminders about, and forms for, the Annual Church Profile. The Clerk shall also serve as exofficio Secretary of the Executive Board.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to plan for and preside over the bi-annual and called meetings of the Corporation and the quarterly Executive Board meetings, and to encourage fellowship and mutual care among the churches. He shall open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. The Moderator shall appoint a Parliamentarian to serve at each meeting of the Corporation and the Executive Board Meetings. He shall also serve as ex-officio chairman of the Executive Board. Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two (2) one-year terms in succession.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to assist in developing fellowship and mutual care among the churches and church leaders. He shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in the Moderator's absence, serve as vicechairman of the Executive Board, and serve as Chairman of the Executive Council.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to assist in receiving, accounting, and disbursing of all the Corporation's monies as authorized by the Corporation or the Executive Board. By virtue of his office, the Treasurer shall be an ex-officio member of the Finance Committee.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to act as the legal agents of the Corporation and shall hold title of all property of the Corporation. In the name of the Corporation they shall be authorized and empowered to receive title to real and personal property, and to sell and convey or mortgage same upon authority duly given by the Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. They are also responsible for keeping an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Corporation, a copy of which is to be kept on file in the Corporation's Office. Trustees are to be three (3) in number, and they are to serve for a term of three (3) years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

The Committees of the Corporation are administrative in nature. These administrative Committees are as follows: Nominating; Credentials; Finance; Resolutions; Time, Place, and Preacher; Program; By-Laws; Christian Education; Strategy; Properties; History; and others deemed necessary or desirable. Each Committee shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. Committee members shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin immediately upon the adjournment of the Annual Fall Meeting of the Corporation. Members are allowed to serve more than one term in succession.

ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES
SECTION 1. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to nominate all officers, leaders, committeemen, and council representatives with the exception of the Director of Missions, the Clerk, and any other paid employees. This committee is to be appointed by the Moderator, and shall retain at least two (2) of its members from the preceding year.

SECTION 2. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in determining when churches are of like faith and order, and when they can be properly accepted in the fellowship of the Corporation. It is also the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other members of the Corporation as voting members of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in securing, administering, and reporting its finances. This committee will plan and propose an annual budget to the Executive Board and suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. This committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. At least two (2) of its members shall be retained from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as an ex-officio member of this committee.

SECTION 4. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in studying resolutions for adoption by the Corporation or the Executive Board. This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Corporation's feelings in regard to the biannual meetings, officers of the Corporation, host churches, and other matters.

SECTION 5. The TIME, PLACE, and PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place, and preacher for the bi-

annual meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Corporation and the host pastors of the bi-annual meetings. It shall be their duty to assist the Corporation in planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Corporation. They shall receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form for the bi-annual meetings which, upon the adoption by the Corporation, shall become its order of business.

SECTION 7. The BYLAWS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to make recommendations relative to Bylaw changes. This Committee shall receive all proposed changes and/or amendments to the Bylaws of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc., and upon study of said changes and/or amendments make recommendations to the Corporation concerning said changes and/or amendments.

SECTION 8. The CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to keep before the churches of the Corporation all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

SECTION 9. The STRATEGY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in determining strategic objectives and staying on course in achieving them.

SECTION 10. The PROPERTIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in properties administration. This Committee shall develop and recommend policies and procedures for using the Corporation's facilities and equipment.

SECTION 11. The HISTORY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the

Corporation's life and work.

ARTICLE XI - INSTITUTIONAL AND AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES

The Denomination's Institutional and Agency Representatives shall include the following: Annuity Board, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes, Christian Higher Education, Religious Literature, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Missions. The representatives for these institutions and agencies shall be responsible for providing information to the churches during the year, and/or giving reports on the work of the institutions and agencies at the biannual meetings of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XII - MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

The Mission Performance Councils undergird and give support to the work of program related ministries of the Corporation. Training leadership shall be a primary responsibility of these Councils. All Mission Performance Councils shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. These Mission Performance Councils are as follows: Seminary Extension, Ordination Advisory, Music, Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Vacation Bible School, Recreation, Media Library, Pastoral Ministries, Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions Development, Youth Ministry, and Family Ministry.

ARTICLE XIII - DUTIES OF THE MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

SECTION 1. The SEMINARY EXTENSION COUNCIL shall direct any Seminary Extension Program for the churches affiliated with the Corporation. This Council shall be

composed of at least five (5) members.

SECTION 2. The ORDINATION ADVISORY COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to act only in an advisory capacity for churches seeking assistance in examining prospective candidates approved for ordination. This Council shall conduct its work within the guidelines of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The MUSIC COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. This Council shall plan and implement the music program of the Corporation. They shall recommend to the Program Committee the music for the bi-annual meetings, and

they shall enlist accompanists for all Corporation meetings.

SECTION 4. The SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of the ASSISTeam to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate Sunday School Work. [Note: Name changed to ACTeam -Associational Consultant Team]

SECTION 5. The DISCIPLESHIP SUPPORT TEAM shall be composed of at least two (2) members and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of this team to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the total Discipleship

Ministry of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION shall consist of the leadership recommended by the WMU Nominating Committee and elected by the Corporation's WMU. This Council will have the responsibility of planning, promoting, conducting, and evaluating WMU work.

SECTION 7. The BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL shall be composed of the officers of the Corporation's Brotherhood. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the work of Baptist Men and also the work of

Roval Ambassadors.

SECTION 8. The VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. The Vacation Bible School Council Director is the leader of the VBS Team and shall plan and promote the Corporation's VBS Clinics. The age-group VBS leaders who comprise this team shall be responsible for conducting the VBS Clinics.

SECTION 9. The RECREATION COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members whose duty it shall be to help plan, coordinate, promote, and conduct the entire recreation program of the Corporation. They shall be available to assist any entity of the Corporation with the planning and conducting of recreational activities. The work of this Council includes setting up and supervising the Basketball Program and any other Sports Program that may be started. This Council will also plan, promote, and conduct the Annual Royal Ambassador Track Meet and the Annual Royal Ambassador Car Competition.

SECTION 10. The MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL shall consist of at least three (3) members. This Church Media Library Organization is often referred to as TACMO. shall be the responsibility of this Council to provide for the mutual sharing of inspiration and information for furthering the Church Media Center Ministry of the

affiliated churches.

SECTION 11. The PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL shall be composed of the following: (1) Pastoral Ministries Director, (2) Church Administration Services Coordinator, (3) Deacon Ministry Coordinator, (4) Vocational Guidance Coordinator, and (5) Church Weekday Education Coordinator, and any others that may be deemed necessary or advisable. The duties of this Council shall be to determine the pastoral ministries emphasis needed or desired and to schedule the events in cooperation with the total programming of the Corporation. The major task of the Council shall be the development and training of ministers through conferences, workshops, clinics, awareness meetings, retreats, and ministry support groups.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. It shall be the duty of this Council to plan and promote any evangelism programs, training projects, and rallies needed or desired. It shall also be the responsibility of this Council to keep evangelism before the pastors and laypeople

of the Corporation.

SECTION 13. The STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for stewardship development and promotion within or among the churches of the Corporation. It will be the task of this Council to seek to lead the churches to set specific, attainable, measurable stewardship goals.

SECTION 14. The MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall consist of at least seven (7) members. This Council shall be responsible for missions development in the total program of the Corporation. The Council shall not only be concerned with already established missions, mission work, and mission activities; it shall be concerned with beginning new mission work. It will be their responsibility to study the missionary needs of the Corporation and make recommendations concerning new work. They shall also recommend missions projects or activities with which the churches in the Corporation may cooperate. They shall strive to get each church in the Corporation to elect or appoint a Church Mission Development Council.

SECTION 15. The YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for planning youth related ministries for the Corporation

including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

SECTION 16. The FAMILY MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for helping to plan, promote, and conduct any program emphasis related to family life. This Council should strive to include the needs of senior adults, single adults, marriage partners, parents, and children.

ARTICLE XIV - THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Executive Council shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, the Directors of the various Program Councils, and three members at large. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to assist the Director of Missions in planning, coordinating, promoting, and executing the Corporation's Programs, making recommendations to the Executive Board or to the Corporation in its Annual Fall Meeting. It shall also be the duty of this Council to plan the annual calendar. This Council shall meet quarterly on another Monday evening prior to each Executive Board meeting, and at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or Moderator.

ARTICLE XV - THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Corporation Officers and key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Pastor, Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Board Members shall be members of the church they represent. If a church does not have one or more of these leaders, it may appoint a substitute for each vacancy and shall submit the name/names with the church profile.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall meet quarterly usually during March, June, September, and November on Monday night following the fourth Sunday of the month unless a conflict necessitates moving the meeting to Monday after the third or fifth Sunday. The Executive Board may meet at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator for the purpose of transacting special or

urgent business.

SECTION 3. Although each church should earnestly strive to get its full contingent of key leaders to attend, there is no quorum requirement for transacting business at a regular or called meeting of the Executive Board.

SECTION 4. The Director of Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive Board and does not have the power to vote.

SECTION 5. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as follows:

a. The Executive Board is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary, and to define his duties.

b. To act for the Corporation between regular sessions of the body.

- c. To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes.
- d. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.
- e. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Corporation the annual budget, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director of Missions relative to the program to be fostered by the Corporation.
- f. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Board in the name of the Corporation shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year without specific authorization of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XVI - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Corporation, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE XVII - AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made

available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of the Corporation's meeting. The said amendment(s) must be presented to the afternoon session and voted on no earlier than the evening session.

ARTICLE XVIII - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES

The business of the Corporation shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE XIX - BUSINESS PROCEDURE

- 1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.
- 2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.
- 3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Corporation or an invited quest.
 - 4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under

consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator, and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

- 7. Any resolution to be presented to the Executive Board and/or bi-annual meetings must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Corporation and published in the Corporation's newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.
- 8. The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.
- 9. Each Fall Session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the annual sermon.
- 10. Reports of committees must be brief not exceeding five hundred words. Other reports should not exceed three hundred words each.
 - 11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.
- 12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Librarian of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina; Biblical Recorder, Raleigh, North Carolina; Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina; Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee; and State Baptist Convention.

13. The host churches of the bi-annual meetings shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words). These histories shall be printed in the annual

minutes of the Corporation.

Proceedings For Spring Session Held at Flat Rock Baptist Church

- 1. The 169th Semi-Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Moderator Adolphus Batchelor, Holly Grove Baptist Church.
- 2. Director of Missions Bill Wallace, Pilot Baptist Church, led in singing the hymn "All the Way My Savior Leads Me."
- 3. Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
- 4. Mr. Batchelor organized the session and appointed Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock Baptist Church, as parliamentarian.
- 5. Rev. Wallace presented the printed program. Mr. George Nichols, Beulah Christian Baptist Church made a motion that the printed program be adopted. Dr. C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church, seconded the motion. The vote carried.
- 6. The following new pastors were recognized: Rev. Hardwick Hatcher, Interim, Samaria; Rev. Steven Wade, Poplar Spring; and Rev. Mike Blevins, Corinth.
 7. The histories of the host churches were presented by Rev. Gary McNair, Flat
- Rock; Rev. Chad Rickenbaker, Ransdell Chapel; and Mrs. Janice Tant, Union Chapel.
- 8. Rev. Wallace introduced Dr. Bill Wakefield, missionary to the Phillippines and South East Asia for thirty-seven years, and Mr. Larry Burns, from the Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

- 9. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "O God, Our Help In Ages Past."
- 10. Mr. Richard Brunson, NC Baptist State Convention, spoke about partnership missions. This year 100 teams, sponsored by the NC Baptist Men, will be going to Honduras. Next year North Carolina will be partnered with Alaska. Baptist Men made an impact in the Ukraine. The North Carolina/South Africa Partnership has been successful.
- 11. Mrs. Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the financial report for March 1999 and the annual financial report for 1998.
- 12. Mr. Batchelor requested donations be sent to the Associational Center for a South African student to help with seminary expenses. Mr. Batchelor worked with this young man while in South Africa. Students are not allowed to work for the three years in seminary. Any donations are appreciated.
- 13. An offering was received to purchase window treatments in the new Associational Center.
- 14. Rev. DuPre Sanders, Franklinton Baptist Church, led in prayer.
- Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "Great Is Thy Faithfulness."
 Rev. Wallace expressed appreciation to Mrs. Joann Wallace and Miss Nanette Warren, both from Pilot Baptist Church, for providing music for the session.
- 17. Dr. C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church, shared the history of Tar River Baptist Association in a celebration of the past. The tie that binds the forty-six churches and four missions is Jesus. Tar River history is rich with deeds and achievements of Christian men and women. Tar River Baptist Association was founded in 1830 at Sandy Creek Baptist Church. Charter members were Fishing Creek, Peachtree, Red Bud, Sandy Creek, Maple Springs, and Flat Rock. Poplar Springs joined on the second anniversary. The Association took a strong stand against making and drinking alcohol. At the twenty-third anniversary the association recommended the formation of Chowan College and Oxford Female College. At the twenty-third anniversary strong resolutions were made to endorse the State Convention and Wake Forest College. At the thirty-seventh anniversary Mr. J. H. Mills, Editor of Biblical Recorder made his first appearance in the Association meeting at Cypress Chapel. At the sixty-sixth anniversary money was raised for the new orphanage. At the seventy-fifth anniversary the minutes showed a membership of 100 churches. A recommendation was made to divide the association. At the seventyseventh anniversary forty-nine churches withdrew to form the Roanoke Baptist Association. In 1955 the Tar River Association voted to divide again. About 1958, thirty churches withdrew to form the W. R. Cullom Association. On April 21, 1980 the Tar River Association celebrated its 150th anniversary at Sandy Creek where it all began. In 1986 the Associational Executive Committee voted to accept land from Cliff Benson of Raleigh to build a new associational center. In 1986 Dr. McCullom retired as the Director of Missions. On March 1, 1987, Rev. Bill Wallace became the new Director of Missions. In 1993 the association sold the house in Justice and grossed \$55,000. In 1994 a proposed plan for the new associational center, drawn by architect Bob Procter, was adopted. The association voted to begin construction. On February 5, 1995, a groundbreaking service was held for the new building. August 18, 1998, the new building opened with 4,935 square feet. In 1999 the finances continue to improve, and programs and ministries continue.
- 18. Rev. Wallace added that much has been done, much is being done, and much more needs to be done. The past is to be learned from, not lived in. The future should be welcomed, not feared. The year 2000 is at hand. As we begin a new century, plan

to grow in number, in spirit, and in service.

- 19. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "Come Thou Fount Of Every Blessing." 20. Rev. Tom Eldridge, Bunn Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.
- 21. Special music was provided by "The Firm Foundation" composed of Ricky and Helen Wadford and Debra Scarboro from Beulah Christian Baptist Church.
- 22. Rev. Billy Tharrington, Beulah Christian Baptist Church, preached the annual
- sermon. 23. Rev. Chad Rickenbaker, Ransdell Chapel, led in the thanksgiving for the evening

meal.

Evening Session Organist: Nanette Warren Pianist: Steve Henson 1. Moderator Adolphus Batchelor, Holly Grove Baptist Church, called the session to order.

2. Handbell music was provided by members of Pilot, Red Bud, and Spring Hope Baptist Churches.

3. Music Council Director Nanette Warren announced that composer Pepper Choplin would lead the Associational Choral Clinic May 13 at Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church. $4.\,$ Rev. C. W. Driver, Union Chapel Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.

5. Director of Missions Bill Wallace, Pilot Baptist Church, led in singing the

hymn "Lead On, O King Eternal."

6. Church and Community Ministries Director Gail Nelms, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, said that we will never run out of needs, so we should identify those needs. The mission field is in our backyard. She announced that the association plans to offer classes in conversational Spanish and sign language. She announced that the association has established a tutoring ministry. The public school system cannot emphasize spiritual values, but we can. We can also provide positive role models for children. Christ can be shared through the tutoring ministry. The following nine people have completed fourteen hours of tutoring training: Adolphus Batchelor, Eleanor Denton, Cecelia Goetz, Diane Jones, Tommie Lankford, Robin Reich, Joann Wallace, Bill Wallace, and Gail Nelms.

7. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah."

8. Rev. Wallace spoke on "Looking Toward Tomorrow." He said that most people live for the future. To look forward effectively we must put the past in perspective. The past is gone forever. All we have is the present, with the hope of the future. Mourn the past if you must, celebrate it if you can, live in the present, and hope for the future.

The Tar River Baptist Association was one of five associations selected by the North Carolina Baptist State Convention for a "futures study" in which the future was studied, research was done, and plans were made to meet the future.

Rev. Wallace spoke about change and what to expect in the twenty-first century. Rev. Wallace announced his retirement effective February 29, 2000 at which time he will have completed thirteen years as the Director of Missions for the Tar River Baptist Association.

9. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "Forward Through The Ages."

10. Mr. Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reporting for the Credentials Committee, said that attendance at the Spring 1999 meeting was as follows: 29 churches and 1 mission represented by 76 messengers, 11 alternates, 22 pastors, 16 associational officers, and 36 guests for a total of 161 people.

11. Rev. Jerry Boyd, Philadelphia Baptist Church, presented the following resolutions from the Resolution Committee:

History of Flat Rock Baptist Church (1824-1999)

Flat Rock Baptist Church was formed by a group from Cross Roads Baptist Church (now Wake Cross Roads Baptist Church) and was fully organized in 1824 when additional members were added from Cedar Creek and Poplar Springs churches to total twenty-one members.

The name "Flat Rock" was chosen due to the many large, flat rocks that are

located near the church.

3:15 Registration

Even before the founding of the church, there was a group of women who met in 1823 called the "Flat Rock Female Missionary Society."

When the group organized, the church joined the Raleigh Association, but in the year of 1831 the church joined the Tar River Association where it remains today.

In 1871 Elder W. A. Barrett, pastor, baptized fifty-five persons; twenty-seven white and twenty-eight black. In the first record book, there is a portion of the roll book for the black members. In 1873 the church paid the black members for their interest in the church house; thus signifying the time the church was segregated.

In 1897 the church building was dedicated. On October 2, 1913, the church voted to buy an acre of adjoining land for the price of \$35.00. On February 12, 1921, the church voted to begin cutting timber to frame a new part to the church and

a wing was then added on each side of the building.

On January 21, 1940, Flat Rock Baptist Church burned to the ground. The origin of the fire was unknown. The present sanctuary was erected and a service of dedication was held on August 30, 1942.

On July 20, 1952, the church voted to become a full-time church holding worship

services every Sunday.

In 1954 the church voted to build a parsonage. The loan on the parsonage was paid and a service of dedication was held at the parsonage on November 20, 1959. Extensive renovations were completed to the parsonage in 1990.

On November 20, 1960, the church voted to build an educational building. Plans were presented on January 1, 1961. In 1961-62 the educational building was

constructed, and the debt on the building was retired in September, 1967.

In 1969 the exterior of the church was bricked, and in 1970 the sanctuary interior was completely renovated. In 1986 stained glass windows were installed in the sanctuary.

Our present pastor, Rev. Gary McNair, preached his first sermon on June 17, 1990 and is today continuing to lead the membership of Flat Rock Baptist Church in the age-old tradition of striving to be a "Light House" in this community.

This year (1999) we celebrate our 175th anniversary.

History of Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church 1912-1999

Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church is located in the Royal Community on state road 1706 in the Harris Township, approximately eight miles south of Louisburg.

The church was founded upon the conviction of Mr. William Caswell Ransdell that he had received a spiritual vision from God to preach and to build a church. In 1912, Mr. Ransdell organized a meeting for Sunday School and Worship which met under

a brush arbor that he had constructed. Mr. Ransdell invited Rev. Walter M. Gilmore, of Louisburg, NC, to assist him with the first meeting. Approximately one hundred people attended. A survey revealed that most of the people who had attended the services were not affiliated with any church; therefore, Mr. Ransdell and Rev. Gilmore continued the services for the remainder of the summer.

During the spring of 1913, under the leadership of Mr. Ransdell, a frame building was erected. Mr. Ransdell who owned a sawmill, donated and cut the timber to erect the building.

At an early church conference, Mr. Isaac Frazier suggested that the church be named Ransdell Chapel in honor of Mr. William C. Ransdell. Some of the charter members present were Mr. John R. Clifton, Mr. Preston T. Clifton, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Frazier, Mrs. Martha H. Horton, Mr. W. T. Jones, Mr. Bailey F. Pearce, and Mrs. Mollie C. Young.

In 1920, Ransdell Chapel was accepted in the Tar River Baptist Association. The membership was seventeen. The first Deacons, elected in 1920, were Mr. John R. Clifton, Mr. Preston T. Clifton, and Mr. Thomas T. Young. The first Board of Trustees elected were Mr. W. T. Jones, Mr. J. B. Horton, and Mr. William C. Ransdell.

During the next two decades, Ransdell Chapel continued to grow and to witness to the community.

In 1943, the building erected under the leadership of Mr. Ransdell was torn down, and a new frame building was erected where the old one stood. The present sanctuary and two wing rooms are the building that was erected in 1943. The Building Committee consisted of Mr. James L. Denton, Mr. John W. Horton, Mr. Thomas T. Young, Mr. Dock Cash, Mr. Charlie Dickens, and Rev. Edward W. Greene.

In 1947, Mr. and Mrs. William T. Horton donated an acre of land to be used for

a cemetery.

In 1960, full-time worship was implemented. The building was completely renovated on the inside.

In 1963, new pews and hardwood floors were installed in the sanctuary. Mr. and Mrs. James S. Hunt gave the pulpit in memory of their daughter Gwendolyn.

In 1968, Mrs. Alma L. Cates donated carpet for the sanctuary in memory of her late husband, Mr. Franklin Thomas Cates.

During the next fifteen years, the church continued to grow in membership and

additions to the building were made.

In 1973, four classrooms, bathrooms, and a fellowship hall were added. Mrs.

Adele C. Cash donated the cost of a well and pump in memory of her late husband Mr.

Dock Cash. The church purchased an additional acre of land to enlarge the cemetery.

In 1975, the exterior of the building was bricked and remodeled. Central heat and air conditioning were installed. New lights were installed in the sanctuary.

In 1978, a note burning ceremony was held to retire the debt.

In 1979, Mrs. Etta Ransdell Ledwick, a daughter of Mr. William C. Ransdell, the last charter member of Ransdell Chapel, went to be with her Lord. She willed her estate to Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church. Her will noted that it was her desire that a parsonage be erected. On July 27, 1980 a Dedication Service was held and the parsonage was dedicated to the glory of God. Dr. W. R. McCollum delivered the dedication message. Rev. Jerry Sosebee and his family were the first to occupy the parsonage.

In 1981, a steeple was installed on the church. It added much beauty to the building, but more importantly, it made the building more visible from a greater

distance.

On June 12, 1983, the church licensed Rev. James Horton to the gospel ministry. A renovation and enlargement of the church took place - a foyer, four classrooms, a baptistery, a choir loft, and air conditioning were added. The inside was completely renovated and insulation was installed in the buildings. Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Rice donated an organ to the church. The church called its first music director, Rev. Rob Small. His wife, Cheryl Small, was the first organist. Mrs. Margie Martin was the first candidate to be baptized in the new baptistry.

In 1989, a picnic shelter was erected. A new heating and air conditioning

system was installed in the parsonage.

In 1998, we had fourteen new members. We also started "Thrilling Thursdays," which is now called TeamKid.

Mrs. Mattie Ransdell Harrison, who now resides at Louisburg Manor, was pianist for twenty-eight years.

During the eighty-seven year history of Ransdell Chapel Baptist Church, thirty-one men have served as pastor. They are as follows:

History of Union Chapel Baptist Church 1910-1994

Union Chapel Baptist Church began in a little log school house. Miss Nellie Robertson and her pupils had discussed the need for a Sunday School. On Sunday, February 10, 1910, at 2:30 p.m. the residents of the community met to discuss and organize a Sunday School. They elected officers and teachers.

The group grew and soon decided they needed a church. Mrs. Bet Ferrell gave an acre of land, and several men in the community cut the logs used to build the

church. In the fall of 1911, the new one-room church was dedicated.

Rev. John Sledge was the first pastor. Some other pastors who labored and served through the early years were: Raleigh Sherron, Theo Davis, Charlie Gray, C. H. Cashwell, A. D. Parrish, and Mr. Stancil.

The depression years were difficult for our church family. During the late thirties the church was closed.

In 1941, Mr. Zollie Woodlief of Franklinton, NC, passed by and noticed grass and weeds around the church and the doors closed tightly. He wondered if there was interest in reopening the doors and having services again. Mr. Woodlief, Mrs. Grissom, and Rev. A. W. Icard, who led a two-week revival meeting, successfully reopened the doors of the church. Many old members returned, and new ones came to the church.

During the next few years Rev. Frank Robinson, H. E. Charry, Victor Dowd, John Parker, Tommy Ellington, E. M. Rhiner, and George Stallings furnished good

leadership for our church.

In 1959 we organized a Brotherhood, adopted the Unified Budget, and organized RAs and GAs. The driveway around the church was graveled and the beauty of our building and grounds was enhanced. A large cross with two smaller ones was erected in the back parking lot. The three crosses continue to serve as background for our Easter Sunrise Services.

Wayne Schlink became the pastor on January 21, 1990. For two years and eight

months Wayne worked hard among us and provided good leadership.

On November 15, 1993, our church family extended a call to C. W. Driver to be the pastor. He began his ministry with us January 1, 1994. Rev. Driver is now in his sixth year.

We have added a Minister of Youth and Music to our church family. He is Matt

Queen, who is enrolled at the Seminary.

Union Chapel is involved in the Faith Sunday School Program. Evangelism strategy continues to add excitement to our total church program.

We welcome ten new members thus far this year.

We recently voted to purchase 6.89 acres of land that surrounds our church for \$60,000.00 and feel that this is just the beginning of bigger and better things in the work of the Lord for Union Chapel.

Associational Executive Board Report

The Associational Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the Annual Meeting in October 1998.

November 23, 1998

Moderator for the session was Vice Moderator DuPre Sanders. Thirty people representing eighteen churches were present. Epp Catlett was appointed as Parliamentarian.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton announced the following: Baptist Men's Day on January 24, the State Baptist Men's Convention in Greensboro on January 29-30, and that several Tar River people received disaster relief training.

Discipleship Support Team Member Lynn Lloyd announced plans for 1999: a Bible study for single adults, a seminar by Rudy Heintzelman, a deacon/spouse banquet, and

a women's conference.

Evangelism Council Director Duane Caldwell announced that the association was in the process of purchasing software for Mapping for Evangelism. Each church will be able to go to the Associational Center to find out prospects that live near church members. He also announced the State Evangelism Conference on January 11-12.

Finance Committee Member Jimmy Weathers presented the financial report. Music Council Director Nanette Warren reported the following: several members of the association participated in the revival choir at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, the associational choir provided special music at the annual meeting, and Christmas Caroling is scheduled for December 21.

Georgette Guin, reporting for WMU Leadership Team Director Kathy Robles, said that over fifty people attended the Baptist Women's Day of Prayer on November 1 at Pilot. An offering in the amount of \$120 was received for the North American Baptist Women's Union. The International Mission Study was led by Mrs. Peggy Boyd with twenty-five attending at Duke Memorial and twelve attending at Bunn. The WMU will participate in a Christmas ministry at the Fountain Correctional Center for Women in Rocky Mount.

Charlie Morgan, Pastor at Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship, announced the following: four people are awaiting baptism, a Toy Run is planned to collect toys for the Associational Toy Ministry, and a new work, Church in the Wind, will begin

in January.

Rev. DuPre Sanders reported that the Franklinton Hispanic Mission meets in individual homes on Friday nights. Sunday worship is held at 3:00 pm at the church. Rev. and Mrs. Grady Nowell have led the mission from the beginning but will be

leaving at the end of the year.

Rev. John Jones, Director of Language Missions for the NC Baptist State Convention, gave a report on the Victoria en Cristo Mission. He served as interim at the mission from August until November. Five people were baptized. The mission is awaiting a response from a man who was issued a call as the new pastor. A larger facility is needed. The mission has about \$14,000 in its building fund.

Rev. Wallace added that land has been promised by a man and his ex-wife. They

are working out an agreement to donate this land to the mission.

Rev. Wallace reported that Cypress Chapel Baptist Church is without a pastor and is struggling. They have difficulty providing funds for an interim. They have applied for congregational assistance from the NC Baptist State Convention. The Convention requires a vote from the association to endorse the application by Cypress Chapel. Rev. Wallace brought a recommendation from the church that their application to the Convention be endorsed by the Association. The recommendation was seconded by Rev. Gordon Joyner. The vote carried.

CCM Director Gail Nelms reported that in October each pastor was mailed a request to send the name of someone in his church who would serve as a missions coordinator. The toy store will be stocked December 1-4. The Toy Ministry will operate December 7-11 and 14-18. During the 1997 Toy Ministry nine people received

Christ.

Director of Missions Bill Wallace reported that seven South Africans visited and ministered in the association October 16-28. He also announced that one hundred azaleas, received from WRAL, were planted by Mr. Wilton Smith and other volunteers. A reputable company has given a quote of \$11,000 to pave the parking lot. We currently have \$2,500 pledged toward this project. A church has \$3,000 in their budget for the associational building fund that will be available the first of the year. Donations are needed so that we can obtain the work at this low bid. Money is also needed to purchase chairs and tables for the large conference room. Other things needed of lesser urgency include: window treatments, seamless gutters, pot sink, ice machine, cooking utensils, and a small TV/VCR.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Dr. C. Ray Pruette.

March 29, 1999 (First Associational Board Meeting in the new Associational Center)
Moderator for the session was Adolphus Batchelor. Thirty-six people
representing seventeen churches were present. Epp Catlett was appointed as

Parliamentarian.

Brotherhood Council Director Wayne Gupton reported twenty racers participated in the Associational RA Car Derby at Union Chapel. He announced the following upcoming events: Baptist Men's Regional Rally on April 6 in Pittsboro, State Lad/Crusader Congress on April 17 at the First Baptist Church in Kinston, and the

Associational Track meet on May 1 at Southern Nash High School.

Georgette Burnette gave the report for the Discipleship Support Team. On March 5 & 6, approximately 100 people attended the "Getting INvolved in His Service" Seminar. A Bible Study for Single Adults began on March 23. Ms. Fran Yeakey of the Maple Springs Baptist Church is facilitating the study. Approximately 100 people attended the Annual Deacon and Spouse dinner on March 15 at the Rock Spring Baptist Church. The Associational Bible Drill and Celebration scheduled for March 27 was canceled. Only one church was participating, so the drillers from Sandy Creek Baptist Church participated in the associational drill at the Raleigh Association and qualified to participate in the upcoming state drill. Mark Cottrell has joined the Associational Discipleship Support Team. The Discipleship Strategy Meeting scheduled for May 17 will be rescheduled.

Charlie Morgan, reporting for Evangelism Council Director Duane Caldwell, announced that the Mapping for Evangelism computer program is at the Associational Center. Everyone is invited to prayer time Wednesday mornings at 9:00 a.m. at Beulah Christian Baptist Church.

Finance Committee Member Jimmy Weathers presented the monthly financial report

for February and the annual report for 1998.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren announced that those who attended the handbell workshop will perform at the Associational Semi-Annual Meeting. The leader for the Choral Workshop (May 13) is a composer, Pepper Choplin. It will be held at the Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church.

Bill Wallace reported for the Sunday School Council. Walk Thru the Bible will conduct a conference on "Sharpening Your Leadership Skills" on September 25, 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. The cost is \$25 per person. If six or more come from the same church the cost is \$20 per person. We are looking for a host church at this time.

Gary McNair said that he would check the calendar at Flat Rock to see if the

church would be available to host the conference.

WMU Leadership Team Director Kathy Robles announced that the Volunteer Connection Team had completed the necessary training. Three of the team members will go on a mission trip to West Virginia in July. They are Kathy Robles, Debbie Marks, and Nanette Warren. Donations to help with the cost of the mission trip may be sent to the WMU Treasurer Georgette Burnette at the Associational Center. The Annual WMU Spring Meeting is scheduled for April 6 at Beulah Christian Baptist Church with guest speaker Joann Stancil, Raleigh Baptist Association. A Spiritual Development Conference, "Is Your Spiritual Tank Empty? Come for Refueling," is scheduled for May 15 at the Associational Center from 2:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m.

Charlie Morgan, Pastor at Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship, announced an average attendance of twenty-seven to twenty-eight in worship at the mission. A Sunrise Service will be held. Rev. Morgan participated in a World Missions Conference in Georgia with the Mission Service Corp. Rev. Morgan requested help in renovating his home. Some area churches held "Vegy Sundays" to collect canned food used to make soup for use at the Homeless Shelter in Raleigh. The Mission was able

to use the Wake Crossroads Baptist Church kitchen for preparation.

Church and Community Ministries Director Gail Nelms said that during the 1998 Toy Ministry the Association ministered to over 200 families, including over 500 children, with the help of 131 volunteers and 32 churches. Fifteen professions of faith were made. The next project is a Tutoring Children and Youth Ministry. Training to certify tutors was held on March 19-21, led by Jo Ellen Stewart, Literacy Mission Associate with the North American Mission Board. Nine volunteers completed the training. More volunteers are needed for the Tutoring Ministry. She said she would be glad to come to any church to explain the ministry.

Bill Wallace added that the tutoring ministry would help students with their

academic work while being a witness to them.

In his Director of Missions Report, Rev. Wallace said a lot of activities had taken place since the last Board meeting in November 1998 such as: the RA Basketball Season, the RA Car Derby, the Annual Deacon Dinner, training for the Vacation Bible School team, several meetings of those working on the Futures Project, a conference designed to help small churches, and a conference to get volunteers involved in Christian service. He announced the following upcoming activities: the VBS Early Bird Clinic for Pastors and VBS Directors scheduled for April 22 at the Associational Center, the VBS Clinic for all workers on May 25 at Louisburg Baptist Church, the Associational Track Meet for boys and girls on May 1 at Southern Nash High School, and Pastor/Staff Appreciation Day on May 30. Rev. Wallace requested prayer for those churches and missions without pastors: Centerville, Cypress Chapel, Duke Memorial, Mountain Grove, Rocky Cross, Samaria, Social Plains, Franklinton Hispanic, and Victoria en Cristo. The First Baptist Church, Spring Hope, called Rev. Gregory Anderson as pastor. He will begin the first Sunday in June. Rev. Wallace expressed appreciation for those who helped make the new Associational Center a reality. New ministries are being planned at the center. Some possibilities are classes in conversational Spanish and sign language. Several training events have been held in the center. It is wonderful to have a building designed for associational ministry. Still needed at the center are curtains and an ice maker. He concluded his report by highlighting two more upcoming events: the Associational Semi-Annual Spring Meeting on April 19 at Flat Rock Baptist Church (assisted by Ransdell Chapel and Union Chapel), and the Week of Prayer for Associational Missions on May 16-23.

Rev. Wallace presented the program for the Associational Semi-Annual Spring Meeting. Macon Barham made a motion that the program be adopted. The motion was

seconded by Tommy Sloop, and the vote carried.

Adolphus Batchelor announced that seminary students in South Africa are not allowed to work for the first three years they are in seminary. Churches and individuals are needed to help pay for the expenses of Aldred Genade, a young South African who worked with the Tar River Associational mission team in Capetown.

Gary McNair announced that a mission team to Honduras was planned for July 7-15. Twelve people can go and only eight have currently committed. Anyone interested in being a part of this construction/brick laying team should call him. After announcements and prayer requests, the meeting adjourned with prayer by Bill Wallace.

- 18. Prayer for the Hurricane Floyd flood victims was opened by Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church, and closed by Rev. Larry Williams, Louisburg Baptist Church.
- Rev. Wallace reported that three loads of supplies for flood victims had been delivered from the association. The association thus far has received \$25,655.00 for the flood victims. Ten thousand dollars was sent to the NC Baptist Men's Hurricane Relief Fund, \$5,005.89 was spent on items requested by the distribution center, and the balance will be used for future projects to help the flood victims.
- 20. Mrs. Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the September Financial Report and the Proposed 2000 Budget. She made a motion that the proposed budget be adopted for the year 2000. The motion was seconded.
- 21. Rev. Mike Blevins, Corinth Baptist Church, made a motion to amend the budget by increasing the salary package of the secretary to \$21,000. The motion was seconded. After much discussion Rev. Blevins made a motion to call for the question. The motion was seconded. The vote to call for the question passed. The vote to amend
- the budget did not pass. 22. Mr. Lloyd West, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, made a motion that the Finance Committee study the financial situation and decide if the association can afford to raise the secretary's salary. The motion was seconded and the vote passed. Rev. Paul Tolbert, Peachtree Baptist Church, asked when the decision would be revealed.
- He was told that the Finance Committee would give a report in November. 23. The vote to adopt the proposed budget for 2000 carried. 24. Mrs. Wood led in singing the hymn "Have Faith In God."
- The Laity Leadership Team (Miss Heather Nelms, Centerville Baptist Church; Mrs. Wendy Edwards, First Baptist Church Spring Hope; and Rev. Mark Cottrell, Pearce Baptist Church) presented a drama comparing nurturing new plants with nurturing new Christians. They also distributed plant sprouts.

26. Laity Leadership Director Mrs. Edwards reported that many growth opportunities were planned for the year 2000. One of these opportunities includes a special Annual Deacon Dinner, March 20, at Rock Spring Baptist Church. Rev. Wallace will cook the meal. Ed Kilbourne, a professional who has done thousands of events and concerts, will provide music and worship around the theme "Amazing Grace." 27. Church and Community Ministries Director Gail Nelms, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, reported that volunteers had distributed 100 Jesus videos at the Tar River Festival in Louisburg and 140 at the Spring Hope Pumpkin Festival. At both festivals, through the Diaper Changing/Cold Water Ministry, brochures about the Association and cups printed with scripture and filled with cold water were distributed. She requested prayer for ministry to deaf people. She said that the Conversational Spanish classes will help people to communicate with the Hispanic people. She encouraged people to sign up for this class that will begin in January. She said that the association will minister again this year through the toy ministry. She told about a lady who was helped two years ago by the toy ministry. This lady was referred again last year. She called to say thank you, but the Lord had blessed her and she wanted someone else to have her time at the store. volunteered to help at the toy store. Mrs. Nelms said that more toys would be needed this year because of the many flood victims. She reported that during the 1998 Toy Ministry fifteen people made professions of faith. She asked pastors to send referrals by November 12. She reported that 132 people volunteered last year, and she urged people to volunteer again this year. She concluded her report by announcing the tutoring ministry that will target first through third grade children. We will help them with their school work and tell them that God loves them. Volunteers are needed to pray, to tutor, and to serve refreshments. 28. Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church, made a motion that the Associational Council bring information, details, and costs for a Disaster Relief trailer to the Associational Board no later than June, 2000. He said that a recovery unit was needed to help people in times of crisis. The motion was seconded and the vote carried.

29. Special music was presented by Mr. Dan Bland, Pilot Baptist Church.

30. After an introduction by Rev. Wallace, Dr. Dewey Hobbs spoke about Baptist Hospital. He said that mailings were available to keep people informed about the hospital and its ministries. He said that every penny of the Mother's Day Offering for the Baptist Hospital goes to help families, many with no hospital insurance. He reported that the hospital owns a hotel. On the ground floor of the hotel, suites are available for families of hospital patients to stay at no charge. He said that Baptist Hospital is a ministry that responds every day to patients and their families.

31. Rev. Eldon Reich led in thanksgiving for the evening meal.

Evening Session

1. The evening session began with pre-service music by Mrs. Brenda Jones, Philadelphia Baptist Church; Mr. Michael West, Bethlehem Baptist Church; and Mrs. Lyndie Strickland, Rock Spring Baptist Church.

2. Moderator Adolphus Batchelor called the session to order.

Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "The Solid Rock."
 Rev. Mark Cottrell, Pearce Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.

5. Baptist Men's Director Wayne Gupton, Red Bud Baptist Church, said that Baptist Men and RAs are mission organizations. He said that without Bill Wallace at the helm many mission efforts would have failed. He added that we can talk about missions and train for missions but the job is not done until we do missions. He encouraged people to "cash in" on mission opportunities. He reported low attendance at the Baptist Men/RA training and at the State Missions Offering Rally. He said that program personalities for the State Missions Offering Rally included Richard Brunson, Kristie Tharrington, Renee Henderson, and Shirlowe Powell. He reported that the RAs had the opportunity to participate in a car derby, a Lad/Crusader Congress, a track meet, camp, and the basketball league. He also reported that nineteen teams participated in the associational golf tournament.

6. Evangelism Council Director Duane Caldwell, Bailey Baptist Church, said that evangelism is sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ. He reported that last year ten churches had recorded no baptisms. This year only nine churches recorded no baptisms. Last year only 300 people were baptized in the association and this year only 289 were baptized. He said that pastors cannot do it all; the lay people need to help. He reported that pastors have been getting together to pray. He added that prayer is where it all starts and encouraged people to be soul-winners.

- · 7. Media Library Director Tommie Lankford, Louisburg Baptist Church, said that we need to stock the library. She reported that in the media center there are wonderful new videos for adults and children, teaching kits, and new soft cover books. She said that a list of the videos in the media center is available. She asked for input as to what kind of materials the people wanted in the media center. She also encouraged people to make donations to the media center in honor or memory of loved ones.
 - 8. Music and Worship Council Director Nanette Warren, Pilot Baptist Church, said that hymns can express feelings and should be used to praise the Lord. She said that if you cannot sing you should pray for those who do. She reported these opportunities to participate in music in the association: caroling, a choral clinic, two hymn sings, and a sight reading class. She encouraged participation in musical opportunities offered by the association:
 - 9. Bible Teaching and Reaching Director David Averette, Franklinton Baptist Church, said that the ACTeam is a group of people who love the Lord and have years of wisdom in Sunday School work. They are available to help the churches in any way. They will go to the churches to help train Sunday School workers (by invitation).
 - 10. Rev. Shelby Stephens, Pilot Baptist Church, presented the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee Report as printed in the Book of Reports. He made a motion that the report be accepted. The motion was seconded, and the vote carried.

 11. Woman's Missionary Union Leadership Team Director Kathy Robles, Philadelphia
- 11. Woman's Missionary Union Leadership Team Director Kathy Robles, Philadelphia Baptist Church, expressed appreciation to the members of the leadership team. She also thanked Rev. Wallace for his support, guidance, and prayers. She announced the following upcoming events: the Day of Prayer, November 7, at Cedar Rock, and the International Mission Study, November 30, at Mountain Grove. She said that the WMU would again this year conduct ministry for Christmas at the Fountain Correctional Center in Rocky Mount. The boxes for this ministry will be packed at Philadelphia on December 3. She requested that each church donate \$80 to the WMU Christmas Prison Ministry to help buy the gifts for the inmates. She also announced Operation Inasmuch to be held November 12-13. She asked churches to call the Associational Center and report projects they will be doing. She concluded by announcing the Mundo Vista Campaign Project to raise money for renovations at Camp Mundo Vista. The goal for this campaign is \$35 per WMU member.
- 12. Rev. W. C. Barham, Pine Ridge Baptist Church, conducted the memorial service.
 13. Special music was presented by Mrs. Gloria Turner and Nanette Warren, both from Pilot Baptist Church.
- 14. Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions report, said that a group from five associations had planned "Operation Inasmuch," a pilot project in which churches are asked to plan hands-on projects in their own communities. In addition each association will plan two or more large projects for more skilled people. These projects are to be conducted on November 12 & 13. The large projects planned for the Tar River Baptist Association are: renovation work on the Safe Space building, construction work at New Jerusalem Baptist Church, and repair work on mobile homes. Four mobile homes have been donated to the association. The mobile homes will be repaired, stocked with appliances and furnishings, and then given free of charge to flood victims who lost everything and had no home insurance. He said volunteers are needed for these three projects. He concluded his report by announcing the following things he plans to do when he retires: to continue serving Christ, to preach, to continue living in his home in Youngsville, to spend more time with his family, to be thankful for the Annuity Board and Social Security, to thank God for his years as a pastor and Director of Missions, to pray for his successor and to stay out of his way, and to be available to do guest speaking and interims. He said that he loves the people in the association, he cares about what happens in the association, and he is grateful for all those who have touched his life. 15. Special music was presented by Rev. Wallace.
- 16. After an introduction by Rev. Wallace, Mrs. Sallie Mae Chason presented "Going to Grandma's."
- 17. Rev. Wallace led in singing the hymn "Because He Lives."
- 18. Rev. Wallace announced that an offering would be received after the service for Operation Inasmuch. He said that people are hurting and need help. He suggested giving what would have been paid for the meal.
- 19. Credentials Committee Chairman Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, said that attendance at the Fall, 1999, meeting was as follows: 34 churches and 1 mission represented by 91 messengers, 11 alternates, 26 pastors, 13 associational officers, and 18 guests for a total of 159 people.

20. Resolutions Committee Chairman Jerry Boyd, Philadelphia Baptist Church, presented the following resolutions:

Resolution 1:

Whereas Bethlehem Baptist Church, being assisted by Beulah Christian Baptist Church and Pearce Baptist Church, has hosted Tar River Association's Fall Annual Meeting;

And whereas they have provided their time and place along with good fellowship

and food;

Be it therefore resolved that we hereby express to each church our appreciation for their gracious efforts to provide for the needs of all who attended this session of the Tar River Baptist Association.

Resolution 2:

Whereas the leaders of this association have provided the program for this

meeting, its time and place;

a ic Distanction

Be it therefore resolved that our appreciation be given to each one of the leaders who has given of his/her time to make this program happen, and to our association secretary who spent many hours putting the paper work in order, and to each one who led us in worship, and to each committee who served this year.

Resolution 3:

Be it therefore resolved that words alone cannot express the appreciation and gratitude to our Director of Missions Bill Wallace. Brother Wallace has served faithfully in our association, giving us direction, leadership, and love to the task set before him. This leadership will help us move into the new millennium.

Be it resolved as an association we will always be grateful for his labor to help us build programs, to reach the lost, to train our people in many ministries, and especially for our new association building as we enjoy it for years to come.

Be it resolved that we say thank you and wish you well in your future.

A motion was made to accept the resolutions. The vote carried.

21. Moderator Adolphus Batchelor gave the gavel to the new moderator, Rev. Tom Eldridge, Bunn Baptist Church.

22. The meeting adjourned with prayer by Mr. Jerry Temple, Bethlehem Baptist Church.

History of Bethlehem Baptist Church

October 19, 1895, Bethlehem Baptist Church in Franklin County was established. Rev. M. R. Pernell and Rev. E. J. Harrell led deacons J. A. Clifton, C. G. Mitchell, and W. W. Perry in constituting a Missionary Baptist Church in the Riley Crossroads Community known as the "County Line". Approximately fifteen members adopted a covenant and articles of faith.

Rev. Pernell was called as the first pastor, at a salary of \$10.00 for 1895 and \$25.00 for 1896. A small building on land adjoining the Riley Academy, or with the academy itself, was used as a meeting house. This land was located across the road from the academy of the academ

from the present church in the area that is now the cemetery.

During the tenure of Rev. C. C. Williams, work on a church building was begun in 1897. J. R. Harris was paid \$36.00 to construct a building 32' x 40' on land donated by W. W. Perry. The first services were held in the new house of worship November 5, 1898. Pastor G. W. Coppedge brought the message, using as his text

Philippians 4:6: "Let your requests be made known unto God."

Church conference minutes from a meeting in June of 1896 recorded five men being named as delegates to the association or "union meeting". According to the early records, delegates were appointed to these meetings several times each year. In 1897 it was reported that "a collection was taken up at the association meeting for Bethlehem Church which amounted to \$5.11." Also in 1897 the first mention of church trustees was noted. E. G. Conyers, H. M. Norwood, and L. Y. Baker were selected to serve in this capacity.

In 1903 mention was made of three delegates being appointed to a Sunday School convention. For the next several years members were regularly appointed to attend convention meetings at churches including Wakefield, Forestville, and Wake

Crossroads.

In 1910 land was purchased for the church cemetery. In the fall of 1911 a committee was appointed to contact each church member "to see how much they would

pay for missions."

Bethlehem had thirteen pastors from 1900-1920. Most served for only one or two years. They included the following: M. R. Pernell, J. D. Morris, W. H. Whitehead, C. G. Lowe, T. C. Singleton, C. C. Williams, Z. W. Wheless, G. P. Harrell, John Mitchner, C. C. Williams, G. T. Mills, C. T. Plybon, J. H. Bunn, and Mack Stamps. Rev. Williams was called to Bethlehem three times during a twenty-year period.

During the 1920's conferences were not held as regularly as in prior years; therefore, little information about church activities exists for that period. Pastors during that decade were W. R. Wallace, H. T. Wright, Frank Edwards, B. G. Earley, S. L. Lamm, Paul Caudle, L. M. Hammonds, and Charles Howard. In 1929 Sunday School rooms were added to the church with lumber donated by C. E. Richards.

Bethlehem Church and the surrounding community did not escape the hard times of depression during the early thirties. However, the commitment of a few faithful members kept the doors of the church open throughout that challenging period. Again, infrequent conferences resulted in sparse records. Reverends L. R. Evans, A. D. Parrish, and D. M. Branch served as pastor of the small congregation through 1938. Rev. William Cone was called to serve from 1939-1942. Rev. A. F. Gibson, a member of Bethlehem, was ordained into the ministry in April of 1942. In 1944 while J. L. Atkins was pastor, a vote "was made to combine the Raleigh and Central Associations." During that year a plan was adopted to send "all boys in service a message each month." A collection of \$4.06 was taken for this purpose.

During the 1950's the church at the "County Line" began to recover from the difficult years of the previous two decades. Repairs were made and new pews were purchased for Sunday School rooms. An electric organ was bought in 1952. The cemetery was expanded; Vacation Bible School was held; and the Baptist Training Union was re-organized. Pastors during this period were Fred Crisp, Eldridge

Vinson, Ellis Hollow, and Wendell Page.

Growth during the 1960's led to a new building program. Six Sunday School rooms were added as well as a basement. The sanctuary was remodeled and a choir loft added. To enhance worship, a new organ was purchased in 1962, and a piano was given by Mr. and Mrs. Eric Pearce in 1963. Roy Walker, David Pope, and Jerry Mullinax were pastors through 1967. Rev. Pope was the first pastor to reside in the community when he moved his mobile home onto the church property. In 1964, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Phillips gave land for a parsonage. When the work on a parsonage began in 1965, church and community members contributed much of the labor and materials needed for the completion of this project. A dedication service was held on July 16, 1967, conducted by Rev. Mullinax.

During the pastorate of Rev. Thomas Lomas from 1967-1972, Bethlehem changed from the Raleigh Association to the Tar River Baptist Association in 1968. In 1972 the parsonage debt was paid off so attention was given to needed improvements for the church. Air conditioning was added, storm windows, doors, and awnings were installed, and repairs made to the roof. A kitchen was furnished in the basement fellowship hall, carpet was added, and Mr. Cordell Richards donated a piano.

The mid 1970's were characterized by beautification projects for the sanctuary. Pews were covered and carpet was installed. Vestibule furniture was given by Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Gay. Pastors Joe Kassam and Robert Haddock served Bethlehem through 1976. Dr. Carroll Trotter and Dr. Elmo Scoggins served interim positions during

1977. Rev. Kenneth Batts was pastor in 1980.

Rev. Alfred Snipes came to Bethlehem as interim pastor in 1980. He then served as pastor until 1985. Rev. Daniel Benfield followed as pastor until 1987. Rev. Snipes again served as interim during 1988 until Rev. John Sisson was called. He led the congregation for almost two years. The eighties brought continued improvement projects, such as new carpet and paint for Sunday School rooms, paint for the church exterior, rear steps from the upstairs level, and a cement patio at the basement area.

Dr. William Pyle, interim during most of 1990, was followed by Rev. Dannie Hayes. WMU, Brotherhood, GAs, RAs, Acteens, and Bible Friends groups were organized. Plans for a new church building were the major focus during the 1990's. In 1993 land for the new church was purchased. While Rev. W. C. Barham was interim pastor, plans were completed for the new sanctuary, and preparations for the Centennial Celebration began. Rev. Eldon Reich, current pastor, was called in August, 1995, and was ordained at Bethlehem on September 10, 1995. Centennial activities were held in October. The Ground Breaking Ceremony for the new building was held October 29,1995.

Excavation of the site began in 1996; bonds were sold to finance construction in 1997; and work on the interior began in 1998. Church members devoted many hours at various tasks to complete the building. On September 12, 1999, the first service was held in the new sanctuary. Pastor Reich incorporated into the service the same text used in the November 5,1898, first service in the old building. A formal dedication service will be held when landscaping work has been completed.

As the physical building program of the church grew in the 1990's, the congregation experienced growth in membership, average attendance, and church

programs. The Deacon Family Ministry Plan, a new Sunday School class, and TeamKids were started. An increased emphasis in evangelism and outreach resulted in training programs, community canvassing, door-to-door witnessing, and the creation of a clothes closet and food pantry. During July, 1999, eleven youth and four adults went on an eight-day mission trip to New Hampshire, the first activity of this type in Bethlehem's history.

Bethlehem Baptist is no longer the little church at the county line. It is the Body of Christ ministering in and beyond the Riley community, truly responding to the Great Commission as it never has before. As we move into the twenty-first century, we will strive to continue the theme of our recent building program "Building on our heritage, looking to our future."

History of Beulah Christian Baptist Church

Beulah Christian Church was founded when a group of dissenters under the leadership of Mrs. Virginia Terrell withdrew from Rolesville Baptist Church. Since no building was available the group began to meet under a bush arbor on Pulleytown Road southeast of Rolesville Crossroads.

In 1887, Calvin Mitchell gave land on which to build near Mitchell's Pond. Mitchell also sawed the timber which had been donated for the building. The first church building was one room, lit by kerosene lamps, and heated by a wood stove over

to one side.

Services in the new church were often interrupted by Sunday morning swimmers in the pond above the old mill site. In September of 1931, a business meeting was held to discuss repairs to the church, but because of the Sunday swimmers, a decision was made to relocate the church to land that had been donated by Burwell Perry. By May 1932, the first service was held at the new (and present) location.

In 1940, repairs were made and wings were added to the church. Classrooms were added; the top was restored; and the outside painted. In 1950 the church floors were sanded, the inside was painted, and new pews were installed along with a piano

and heating.

As the congregation grew in membership, improvements, repairs, and additions were made. By 1959, more classrooms were added. In 1962, the church added stained glass windows, placed in honor of or in memory of loved ones. At this time, the church decided to brick the building.

Services at Beulah were held in connection with New Hope Christian Church, and the pastor commuted to accommodate both services each Sunday. In 1963, the church decided to emerge independently; so Beulah began on its own.

In 1967, the church purchased two acres of land from Ms. Lucy Perry Ueargin and

built a parsonage just north of Highway 96.

In 1968, the Adult Men's Class had the well dug, the Young Men's Class bought a pump; and the Intermediate Boys' Class purchased and installed the water fountain. Bathroom facilities were completed between 1969 and 1970.

In 1975, a fellowship building was built; and in 1978, the Women's Fellowship

raised money to brick the fellowship building.

In 1979, the church added the baptistery. The pews were covered by members in honor of or in memory of loved ones. The steeple was added by the Missionary Women.

A picnic shelter was built in 1982 in honor of Ms. Mamie Pulley, the oldest

member still attending our congregation.

In 1985, plans were made to build a new church on the same site. By March 9, 1986, the new church had been completed and the first services held.

On September 18, 1988, Rev. Billy Tharrington was called to be pastor.

In October 1989, Beulah Church petitioned the Tar River Baptist Association for membership and was received under the watchcare of the association.

In 1991, Beulah ordained three men into the gospel ministry.

In 1997, many discipleship classes were held and are still going strong. The church presented a drama entitled "Heaven's Gate, and Hell's Flames."

In June 1998, a church van was purchased. Mitchell Mill Road was adopted for the Adopt-a-Highway clean up project.

In July 1998, scholarship funds were received and the church decided to match the funds and give scholarships to active members who attend college.

In August 1998, a part-time secretary was hired.

Also in 1998, several support groups, prayer groups, and committees were formed. Three rest home ministries were started, and a Sunday School Class is held every Sunday for the residents at Hillside Nursing Center. The church sponsored Crystal Turnage on a missionary trip to the Russian Region for two weeks. Two and

thirty-six one hundredths acres of land were purchased for further developing. A

monthly newsletter was started.

Since 1998, Beulah has called Minister of Evangelism Mike Jones. He is now serving at Beulah and attending SEBTS. The church also voted to call a Prayer Minister. Numerous love offerings have been received for members in need and for the needy in the community. The building and grounds committee built a new storage building. Money was raised to help start a playground at Beulah.

From 1998 to 1999, Beulah ordained three deacons and two ministers, and licensed one minister. A new church council was formed. This group handles the church's business so that the deacons are free for more spiritual ministry.

Today, Beulah is more beautiful than ever with its original stained glass windows still on each side as they were in the old church. The picture of Jesus kneeling originally overlooked the baptistery. It is now out front overlooking all who come in. The lighted steeple, like a beacon, can be seen for miles around by anyone seeking restitution through God's forgiveness.

History of Pearce Baptist Church

Following a revival meeting held at the Old Pearce Schoolhouse in the spring of 1915, the Pearce Aminy Baptist Church was organized. W. D. Harrington and C. T. Plyborn conducted this meeting and led in the organization of the church on April 25, 1915. Thirty-nine members signed the covenant. The records show sixty-nine members transferred their membership from other churches, principally from Poplar Spring Baptist Church. These are referred to as charter members. The first deacons were: J. R. L. Pearce, H. S. Pearce, B. F. Pearce, H. K. Privette, E. C. Arnold, W. H. Privette, and C. W. Perry.

It is not clear exactly when the church building was started, but according to Mr. S. G. Phillips, the work was begun in 1917 and completed in 1918 at the approximate cost of \$800 to \$1,000. Mr. Phillips was the overseer of the work and most of the materials and labor were donated. In November the name Aminy was

dropped and the present name adopted.

A storm nearly tore the church off the foundation in 1936, and plans were laid to erect a new church. Work began in January, 1938, and was completed in 1939. The present church interior was completed in 1949 with a loan of \$1,500 from J. W. Perry, Sr. During 1952 the church added a balcony and vestibule, painted the interior, renovated the choir loft, put a new top on the church, installed rest rooms, and put carpet on the floor.

In October 1953, the church voted to build a parsonage. Two thousand dollars were raised on Homecoming of that year, and the church borrowed \$12,000 to complete the work. Mr. J. W. Perry, Sr. gave the brick, and several others donated labor. The lot was given by Mr. Jeff Pearce and family. The total cost of this attractive

eight room home was \$18,142.45.

The school property was acquired in February, 1956, at the cost of \$2000. We also joined the Tar River Baptist Association.

From 1959-1963 major remodeling of the annex was completed. A breezeway connecting the church and annex was built in memory of J. W. Perry, Sr.

We celebrated our fiftieth anniversary in 1965. At that time we installed memorial stained glass windows. The baptistery was installed with the painting donated by L. D. and Inez Pearce.

Four pastors and two interim pastors have served the church since 1985.

During 1995, we built a playground with proceeds made from the concession stand at the Tar River Baptist Association softball games. In April, 1996, we started a project to renovate our sanctuary. We repaired and painted walls, added crown molding, and installed new lighting with chandeliers donated in honor or memory of various people. We also added new carpet and pew covers.

Mark Cottrell was called as our full time pastor in January, 1997. In 1998 he

went with the Tar River Baptist Association mission team to South Africa.

Also in 1998 the Dianne Ray Memorial Scholarship began for students in the Masters of Divinity Church Planting Program at SEBTS. Scholarship recipients thus far are Kenny and Melissa Stevens, who will be church planters in Asia in 2000.

Two members of our church, James and Lausanne Carpenter, are missionaries to

Southeast Asia.

Four ordained ministers of the Gospel have come from this fellowship: Roy J. Smith, Johnny J. Smith, Coye Jeans Jr., and Ronald S. Pierce.

Our history is part of a bigger family, THE FAMILY OF GOD.

Baptist Men's Council/Royal Ambassadors Report

The Baptist Men and RAs are "missions" oriented organizations. That is what we are all about. Let me say that without Bill Wallace at the "helm" our missions efforts could have sunk many times. He was there to fill the void, whether it was with a chainsaw or a hammer, track meet or car derby, in the pulpit or on a missions trip. The Baptist Men really appreciate his leadership and active participation in missions.

Several training sessions were conducted throughout the year. Many leaders are missing opportunities to become better at what they are doing. I was disappointed in the attendance at our Tar River Key Leadership Conference and the NC Missions Offering Rally. Richard Brunson, NC Baptist Men Executive Director, was the guest speaker, Renee Henderson provided entertainment and Kristi Tharrington shared her experience as Camp Mundo Vista Counselor. Disaster Relief veteran Shirlowe Powell brought in a volunteer team with his feeding unit and served supper. We had very few pastors present, so few that it was noticeable.

Laity Leadership Report

"A few years ago, the dominant interest of six-year olds in the US was a group of teenage superheroes called the Mighty Morphin Power Rangers. The shows were an unlikely hit - originally produced on a very low budget in Japan, then badly dubbed into English. The key to the show's appeal was the characters' ability to 'morph.' Ordinarily they were normal adolescents, but as needed they could access a power beyond themselves to become martial arts heroes for justice. Their rallying cry in moments of crisis was 'It's morphing time!' and they would be transformed with the ability to do extraordinary things.

The show became such a huge hit that the term <code>morph</code> has begun creeping into magazine articles and everyday conversations and may become part of our permanent vocabulary. It became a standard phrase around our house if someone was in need of

serious attitude adjustment: 'It's morphing time.'

Of course, it is not just six-year-olds who want to morph. The desire for transformation lies deep in every human heart. This is why people enter therapy, join health clubs, get into recovery groups, read self-help books, attend motivational seminars, and make New Year's resolutions. The possibility of transformation is the essence of hope. Psychologist Aaron Beck says that the single belief most toxic to a relationship is the belief that the other person cannot change.

The little word morph has a long history. It actually comes from one of the richest Greek words in the New Testament. . . Morphoo means 'the inward and real formation of the essential nature of a person.' It was the term used to describe

the formation and growth of an embryo in a mother's body.

Paul used this word in his letter to the Galatians: '. . . until Christ is formed in you.' He agonized until Christ should be born in those people, until they should express his character and goodness in their whole being. Paul said they - like us - are in a kind of gestation process. We are pregnant with possibilities of spiritual growth and moral beauty so great that they cannot be adequately described

as anything less than the formation of Christ in our very lives.

Paul used another form of this word when he told the Christians in Rome that God had predestined them to be 'conformed to the image of his Son.' This word, summorphize, means to have the same form as another, to shape a thing into a durable likeness. Soiritual growth is a molding process; we are to be to Christ as an image is to the original." (This lengthy quote is taken from The Life You've Always Wanted by John Ortberg, Zondervan Publishing Company, Grand Rapids, Michigan, 1997, p. 22-23. It so beautifully describes the goal of the Tar River Discipleship Supporters: to provide encouragement, assistance, and opportunities for people to morph, or to be changed into the image of Christ.)

- Minister's Study/Fellowship facilitated by Rev. Mark Cottrell, "The Power of Vision"
- Women's Conference "Perceive the New" featuring Mrs. Ruth McRoberts Ward, author and counselor, York, PA

The Sandy Creek Church was the only participant in Children's Bible Drill during 1999. They joined Raleigh Association for the Associational Drill. Due to flooding from Hurricane Floyd, the September Strategy Meeting was cancelled.

Mission Report: Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship

This year has been one of change for Damascus Road. We seem to have been in a "reorganization" mode, put there by God. Since we started the church in 1995, we have tried to reach the unchurched in a "traditional/non-traditional way." We found this year, through God's leading, that we were to go more toward the non-traditional side of this, and God has blessed our efforts. We began a ministry to the homeless through the church, handled by members of the church who are also members of Soldiers for Christ Motorcycle Ministries, headquartered in Owensboro, KY. We contacted churches in the area, asking them to hold "Veggie Sundays" for us. This is where any member who wishes to, may bring a can of vegetables to church on a given Sunday, and we pick them up. We made soup in the kitchen of Wake Crossroads Baptist Church, and because of God's help through His People, delivered 127 bowls to the "Overflow," a city shelter in Raleigh. We attached a tract to each bowl, and shared Jesus with anyone we could. We saw God at work as we were able to feed 212 men and women with those 127 bowls. No one who was hungry went unfed, and there were even enough for seconds. We had nine bowls left over! Praise God! Along with this, we gave out blankets that an area hospital had given to us. We have distributed blankets to homeless, other churches, and others in need.

We began a monthly "community dinner" (a fancy name for pot-luck) so that the church family could grow closer over a meal. This has been a great success and

is ably handled by Mrs. Amy Bower.

In March, Pastor Charlie went to Statesboro, Georgia, as a member of a thirty-two member team of missionaries taking part in a World Missions Conference. He spoke in five churches in four days. Also in March, David Phelps, a Southeastern Seminary student came aboard as Associate Pastor. His wife Becky is our secretary, and the church is blessed by their willingness to work and their presence among us.

In May, we started a new newsletter called "RoadWorks" issued whenever Pastor Charlie has time to write it up. July brought in some new activities, the largest of which was VBS. We have only five children who attend regularly; however, thanks to Steve Hebert (the famous "Damascus Road Landbarge Driver," the landbarge being the church van) and his wife Karen, our Director of Childrens Ministry, we had a total attendance of fifty-four children for five days. Dave and Becky Phelps, and David and Amy Bower assisted. Also in July, David Bower and Pastor Charlie rode motorcycles to Owensboro, KY, to attend the National Rally of Soldiers for Christ. We did approximately 1,800 miles in four days. Pastor Charlie preached each morning of the Rally, and David received his backpatch in a special ceremony along with three others. We were blessed by the fellowship found at the Rally and made many new friends. We also went on a tour while there of a motorcycle museum. The gentleman who owns it started for us, a 1912 Pope Motorcycle, one of four in the world that still runs.

August brought some problems to the Road. Financial difficulties set in, and on August 29th, a total of \$4.18 was in our account. HOWEVER, God is not done with the Road yet, and He supplied all our needs through the help of the State Convention. Praise Him for His Bounty. As amazing as that was, the reason for it

was not discerned until later in September ...

David and Becky's 16 year old son Jeremy was killed by a car while riding his bicycle. How does one answer the question "Why?" when something like this occurs. That became clear in September, when seven of Jeremy's friends who had begun coming to the Road after his death, received Jesus as their personal Saviour. Two others rededicated their lives. We as a church have been trying to get a youth program in motion for two years with no success. We now have a youth group, led by David Phelps and wife Becky, that has fourteen members from 14-18 years of age. I am reminded of a saying whose origin is lost in antiquity: "that one should die, so the majority might live." Our youth group recently went on a three-day retreat to Luray, Virginia, where they camped, rafted, and celebrated being in the Lord. Praise God!

In closing, the Road is now running thirty plus in worship. We have closed Sunday School and Wednesday night services, as they just do not seem to fit the model of our "non-traditional" church. They will be replaced with as yet unnamed programs. We have twelve to baptize, and will be doing so in our new baptistry as soon as it is finished. We are purchasing a lovely 3'x3'x8' cattle trough and will be making it into a place of new beginnings -- which is just what the Road has become.

The mission has not met since December, 1998, since we do not have Hispanic speaking leadership. Please continue to be in prayer for the mission that God's will be done, that He would lead an Hispanic pastor to the mission, and that through the mission many Hispanics in the area will be reached for God.

Mission Report: Hispanic/Victoria en Cristo

Victoria en Cristo has been through much transition this past year. During the months without a pastor, the members accepted responsibility for helping the church move forward. John Jones was interim pastor for about four months, then other pastors came to preach on Sunday mornings with our members responsible for Sunday night and Wednesday night services.

In June of this year, we welcomed a new pastor, Rev. Elvis Pereira and his family to our congregation. Under the leadership of Rev. Pereira the church is becoming more stable, and members are being trained to minister to people of their own culture. Training in Baptist doctrine and discipleship of youth and adults are major focuses. Active involvement in missions for everyone in the church is

stressed with several projects already planned for the immediate future.

Future plans include continued discipleship in preparation for member-led Bible studies in areas where there are large concentrations of the Hispanic population. During the past year our membership has grown with twelve baptisms and three by transfer of membership. We are also looking forward to the time when we will worship in a new building, one that is more adequate to meet our growing needs. We are confident that the Lord will work out all the details according to His perfect plan.

Lake Royale is a gated community near Bunn, NC. Your Association ministers there each Sunday morning at 8:30 a.m. It is exciting to see new worshippers almost every Sunday. Attendance ranges between 45 and 70, and each Sunday morning people come with covered dishes of such things as scrambled eggs, ham and sausage biscuits,

grits, waffles, fruit, jelly, jam and sweet rolls.

Following a hearty breakfast, the service usually lasts no more than about forty-five minutes. Congregational singing, prayer, special music, and a message from God's Word are the chief components of worship. Mr. and Mrs. Terry Alford (Ephesus Baptist Church) lead the congregational singing and provide special music. Miss Nanette Warren (Pilot Baptist Church) is the pianist. Director of Missions Bill Wallace proclaims God's Word. A host of talented lay persons within the fellowship fill in very effectively when one of the worship leaders has to be away.

The services at Lake Royale are warm and relaxed. Those who attend feel free to share testimonies, music, and prayer requests. Even though there is no budget, the people give well. The money received is used for mission causes both at home and around the world. Lake Royale Christian Ministries contributes monthly to world hunger, and this ministry also meets a lot of local needs. Although the ministry at Lake Royale is sponsored and conducted by the Tar River Baptist Association, it receives no funds from the Association's budget. The work is completely self-supporting. It is not uncommon to have worshippers come from outside the gated community just to attend the services. The welcome mat is out, and we are always glad to see anybody come from anywhere to worship.

Volunteers are also needed NOW at the Baptist State Convention Distribution Center in Tarboro (week days between the hours of 2:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m.). To volunteer contact Pastor Levell Waters or Carolyn Barbe at either 252-641-0495 or 252-641-0484. Those desiring to volunteer for clean-up work in the Tarboro area should contact E. J. Poindexter at 252-823-0111.

Operation In-As-Much (Matthew 25:40) is scheduled for November 12 and 13. We would like to have 100% involvement from the forty-five churches and four missions in our association. For churches that have not yet identified projects, we will be repairing and refurbishing one or two mobile homes on our parking lot on those two days. Volunteers are needed to do repair work, cleaning, painting, and making curtains for these units. 
Church and Community Ministries Director's Report

Executive Board Report

The Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the Semi-Annual Meeting in April, 1999. Both meetings were held at the Associational Center.

June 28, 1999

Moderator for the session was Adolphus Batchelor. Fifty-eight people were present, representing twenty-one churches and missions. Wayne Gupton was appointed as Parliamentarian.

The new pastor at Victory in Christ, Elvis Pereira, and his family were

recognized.

Baptist Men Council Director Wayne Gupton announced that the NC Baptist Men's Department had divided the state into regions. The Director for our region is Stephen Moore, Pastor at White Level. Brotherhood and RA Leader training will be offered during the Key Leadership Conference on August 16. The third annual State Missions Rally will be held August 29 at Red Bud. Program guests will include Richard Brunson and Renee Henderson. The Disaster Relief Unit will serve supper.

Laity Leadership Team Member Heather Nelms announced that Mark Cottrell, Pastor of Pearce Baptist Church, was a new team member. Miss Nelms announced that the May Strategy meeting was cancelled. The next Strategy Meeting will be September 20. A Women's Conference entitled "Perceive the New" is scheduled for September 11 at Maple Springs. On July 8 the Laity Leadership Team will meet to plan for the year 2000.

Evangelism Council Director Duane Caldwell announced that the Mapping Center for Evangelism software is available at the associational center. Recently we received the latest update to the software. The Evangelism Conference to be offered during the Associational Key Leadership Conference will be based on "Praying Your Friends to Christ." The Evangelism Council recently helped Mike Blevins and the Corinth Church with a "Jesus" video distribution. Six people responded to this video and attended revival.

Rev. Wallace, reporting for the Finance Committee, presented the May Financial Report. He reminded the churches that the work of the association is funded by gifts from the churches. He also stated that some funding comes from Cooperative Agreements with the NC Baptist State Convention. Requests for Cooperative Agreement funds have to be requested a year in advance. The Cooperative Agreement requests for the year 2000 have been returned and most of what was requested was granted. He informed that work of both the State WMU and Brotherhood is totally funded through this NC State Missions Offering. Ten percent of the State Mission Offering given by Tar River churches is returned to the Tar River Baptist Association to support mission work. The Finance Committee meets every month. All designated money is used only for its designated purpose. Each church is asked to consider giving at least five percent of undesignated funds to associational missions. It is also suggested that each church put the associational newsletter in its bulletin each month to increase awareness of the association. If placing the newsletter in the bulletin is not possible, maybe someone could stand at the door and distribute it following the service. The association exists to help strengthen the churches.

Music & Worship Council Director Nanette Warren announced seventeen people in attendance at the Choral Clinic. Ken Lake led the Music Sight Reading Class. At the Music Conference, during the Associational Key Leadership Conference, plans will be made for the year 2000. Worship services are held at Lake Royale every Sunday morning at 8:30. Musicians, soloists, quartets, etc. are needed to help with the music for each service. Contact the Associational Center if you would like to

volunteer.

WMU Leadership Team Director Kathy Robles announced that the Team will travel to Caraway for training. She expressed gratitude for the contributions that have been made to help with the mission trip to West Virginia. Those going on the trip include Kathy Robles, Debbie Marks, and Steve and Georgette Burnette. A conference for Hispanic women is scheduled for August 22. A conference will be held for the

WMU Leaders at the Associational Key Leadership Conference. WMU reports need to be mailed to the NC Baptist State Convention WMU and to Kathy.

Georgette Burnette, reporting for Pastor Charlie Morgan (Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship) said that a church supper was held recently. She also reported that Pastor Appreciation Day was observed. One profession of faith was made. Music is provided each Sunday by Dan and Holly Wagner. Blankets were supplied to a mission in Wilson and a church in Sharpsburg.

Rev. Wallace, reporting for the Victory in Christ Hispanic Mission, said that a written report was received from Linda Hicks. The mission is planning to enter into a building program. They have the money to get started but are waiting to get the deed on the land cleared. A mission statement has been written. Their new pastor is Elvis Pereira. His wife's name is Lucia. The Pereira's have two boys, Elvis, Jr. and Edward. When Pastor Elvis arrived they had no furniture. Recently two beds and a few pieces of living room furniture were donated. Approximately seventy people are currently attending the mission.

Rev. Wallace, reporting for the Lake Royale Mission, said that he enjoyed the privilege of preaching at the Lake each Sunday morning. Services begin at 8:30 a.m. with a breakfast. The mission began with three people. Now about 50-70 attend. Recently one person was baptized. Different denominations meet together. Nanette Warren plays the piano each Sunday. Terry and Jenny Alford lead the singing.

Kathy Robles added to the Victory in Christ report that the mission recently held anniversary/revival services under a tent. The services ended with a meal on Sunday. They have recently begun Saturday youth services. The mission also has a strong, active WMU.

Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions' Report, said that the association recently sponsored two VBS Clinics and a Media Conference. The Ordination Advisory Council has been meeting. Rev. Wallace has been doing counseling and meeting with Pastor Search Committees. He encouraged all Key Leaders to attend the Associational Key Leadership Conference on August 16 at Harris Chapel. A new minister orientation for this region will be offered August 23. The next associational golf tournament will be August 28 at Hickory Meadows. On September 25 Walk Thru the Bible Ministries will conduct a "Sharpening Your Leadership Skills" Seminar at Harris Chapel Baptist Church. Dr. Joe Barrow, a missionary to South Africa and teacher at the Baptist College, recently died. Prayer was requested for his wife Faye and their three adult children. Rev. Wallace announced that Ms. Addilene Leonard, from the Maple Springs Church, started putting up window coverings in the new Associational Center today. Other things needed are a small fence to keep people from driving on the grass at the Dogwood end of our building and an icemaker. Dedication Service and Open House will be August 8. We would like to hang pictures of all the churches on the walls of the new Associational Center. For \$100 Ray Strawbridge will take the picture and give one to the church and one to the association.

Mr. Batchelor recognized those present who had been to South Africa. He announced that any of the team members who went to South Africa would be glad to share their experiences with any church that might like a presentation.

Church and Community Missions Director Gail Nelms reported that the Tutoring Ministry will be operational by the opening of school this fall. Initially, we plan to target first through third grade students from Louisburg Elementary School. The principal from Louisburg Elementary School, the teachers and the Franklin County School officials have been very receptive. We will get referrals from the teachers and from the churches. We hope that the associational tutoring ministry will be a pattern that volunteers can take to their churches to begin their own tutoring ministry. Franklin County schools provided "Wings" training at no cost to volunteers on Thursday, June 17 at the associational center. Fifteen volunteers attended this workshop. We are also structuring a "Conversational Spanish" Ministry. The goal is to teach non-speakers to converse in Spanish the simplest way. Connie Waters, who moved to Guatemala with her missionary parents while she was still a child, is helping structure this ministry. Daytime and evening classes of "Conversational Spanish" will be offered. We are tentatively planning to offer two-hour classes weekly for a total of six weeks.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Gordon Joyner.

September 27, 1999

Moderator for the session was Adolphus Batchelor. Fifty-two people were present, representing nineteen churches and missions. Epp Catlett was appointed as Parliamentarian.

Baptist Men Council Director Wayne Gupton reported that supplies for flood victims were taken by the Association to Tarboro and to Greenville.

Kathy Robles added that families in the Nashville area needed furniture, appliances, and baby items. She will be responsible for taking these donations to the families.

Bill Wallace added that fifty-one families in Franklin County lost their homes due to the hurricane/flood.

Duane Caldwell added that seventy-three employees in the Nash County area lost homes.

Bill Wallace explained that flood relief donations were being used for immediate needs that are known. A portion will be sent to the NC Baptist Men's Hurricane Relief Fund. A portion will be kept at the Associational Center to help with relief/recovery needs in the Tar River Baptist Association.

Georgette Burnette, reporting for the Laity Leadership Team, announced that about seventy-seven women attended the women's conference "Perceive the New" September 11. Ruth Ward from York, Pennsylvania was guest speaker. Mrs. Burnette also announced that Mark Cottrell will be facilitating a study for ministers on the book Power of Vision.

Finance Committee Member Jimmy Weathers, presented the August Financial Report. He encouraged each church to give 5 percent to associational missions. He also

encouraged church members to read the associational newsletter.

Evangelism Council Director Duane Caldwell announced that the Evangelism Council meets regularly for prayer. They are looking at the possibility of an association wide evangelism event in the year 2001. He also announced FAITH training to be held October 11 at First Baptist Church, Rocky Mount. FAITH is evangelism through the Sunday School.

Music & Worship Council Director Nanette Warren announced that two hymn sings

were held - one at Corinth and one at Ephesus.

WMU Leadership Team Director Kathy Robles reported that WMU dues should be sent by October 1. She announced a meeting for the Associational WMU Leadership Team and the area directors to be held October 10. She encouraged attendance at the Baptist Women's Day of Prayer November 7 at Cedar Rock and the International Missions Study November 30 at Mountain Grove. She reported that she, Nanette Warren, and Elaine Lewis will be attending State WMU Resource Team Training at Caraway in November. She said that again this year the WMU will be involved in the Christmas ministry at the Fountain Correctional Center in Rocky Mount. Each church is asked to donate \$80 to buy items for the gift boxes and fruit. The boxes will be packed on December 3 at Philadelphia Baptist Church. A party will be held at the prison on December 4 and the inmates will be given the gift boxes and the fruit.

Charlie Morgan, Pastor at Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship, reported that a few weeks ago there was not enough money to pay the bills at the mission or to pay his salary. Now the finances are looking better. He reported that a band was started called the "Know Hope" band. He said that his Associate Pastor's teenage son was killed a few weeks ago. The friends of the boy are now attending Damascus Road. He reported that the Sunday School and Wednesday night services have been cancelled and

that eleven people have been baptized so far this year.

Duane Caldwell reported that Bailey Baptist Church and the mission, Victoria en Cristo, recently had a joint service in which seven or eight people from the mission were baptized. He said that Elvis Pereira is doing a great job as pastor for the mission. He is teaching the members what it means to be a church. He also reported

that the mission is "busting at its seams" and needs a larger facility.

Church and Community Ministries Director Gail Nelms said through the tutoring ministry we can meet the educational needs of school-age children, share the gospel, and demonstrate Christ's love. Louisburg Elementary School is the targeted area. The teachers will help assess the children's needs and the busing director will take care of transportation. Volunteers are needed to tutor, to serve refreshments, to be prayer partners, and to donate funds for materials. Our goal is to have our tutoring ministry serve as a model. We would like to see tutoring ministries in the communities throughout our association. She also reported that work continues on the Conversational Spanish classes. We are in the process of completing lesson plans and organizing materials. The course is designed as a tool for simple communication with Hispanic people. It is anticipated that the course will involve eight weeks of study, about two hours each session. It will probably be offered in early January. She announced that the association sponsored a "Diaper Changing Station and Cold Water Booth" at the Tar River Festival. Jesus videos (approximately 100) were distributed. She announced that on October 2, we will sponsor this booth

at the Pumpkin Festival in Spring Hope. We plan to distribute approximately 140 *Jesus* videos. She announced that materials concerning the Toy Ministry will soon be mailed. She encouraged church members to collect toys and to volunteer to help with this ministry. She reported that last year we served over 500 children and approximately 200 families; we had 132 volunteers and 15 professions of faith. We will begin setting up the store on November 30 and the store will be open through December 17.

Director of Missions Bill Wallace said that during the past two weeks we have seen wholesale devastation hit Eastern North Carolina. Many lives have been lost, and a tremendous number of families have been left homeless. We will try to keep our churches informed about those needs. He encouraged churches to put together teams to help with clean-up and repairs. He reported that on September 18 volunteers from White Level, Pilot, and Flat Rock worked at the Diaper Change/Cup of Cold Water Booth. He announced that October 2, we will be ministering in the same way at the Pumpkin Festival in Spring Hope. He reported that the "Sharpening Your Leadership Skills" Seminar by Walk Though the Bible, at Harris Chapel Baptist Church September 25, was excellent. He announced the Fall Annual Meeting to be held at the Bethlehem Baptist Church on Monday, October 18. He reported that November 12-13 are the dates for "Project In-As-Much." We want 100% of our churches participating in this mission blitz. "Project In-As-Much" is a joint effort of five northeastern North Carolina Baptist Associations. Television camera crews will film some of this work for use in planning, promoting, and publicizing future efforts of this kind. A list of some of the kinds of projects that each church could do are included in a letter mailed to each church's WMU Director, and also in the October issue of "CURRENTS OF THE TAR." Larger projects demanding more specialized skills are targeted in each association. In the Tar River Association there are two larger projects: (1) Renovation work at Safe Space in Louisburg, and (2) Construction work at the New Jerusalem Church just outside of Franklinton. He announced that he and Mike Blevins will be going on a mission trip to South Africa on October 28.

Adolphus Batchelor reported that as moderator for the Association he had, according to the By-laws, appointed the following to serve as the Director of Missions Search Committee: Terry Alford, Epp Catlett, Mary Conn, Annette Coppedge, Elaine Lewis, Charlie Morgan, Ray Pruette, Eldon Reich, and Jimmy Weathers.

Bill Wallace said that once the Search Committee had found someone, the association will have a meeting for the people to meet the prospect and to ask questions before the vote is taken. A decision will have to be made as to whether the vote will take place at the same meeting or another meeting.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Charlie Morgan.

Historian's Report

BAILEY - We are planning for an education building, a youth pastor was hired, and we acquired a church van. Christmas and Easter Cantatas were presented. Soul winning Commitment Sunday was followed by Soul Harvest Day. We distributed "Jesus" videos. BETHLEHEM - The youth went on a mission trip to Dover, New Hampshire. Our first worship service in our new building was held September 12, 1999. TeamKid was

started. We participated in the Associational Toy Ministry and helped victims of

Hurricane Floyd.

BEULAH CHRISTIAN - A Minister of Evangelism was called. We started a monthly newsletter and three nursing home ministries. We formed a Parents-in-Prayer-for-Teens group, a Neighborhood Evangelism Team, a Y2K Task Force, an Adopt-a-Highway Clean up Project, and a Church Council. A storage building was built. We raised money for and started a church playground. We received love offerings for the needy and to send a student, Tessa Riddle, to the Word of Life Branch in New York. The Brotherhood and youth sponsored a benefit for a transplant patient. We regrouped our children's church programs. A cookbook was made as a love offering for Pastor Appreciation Day. Proposed Ministry Action Budget for 2000

The purpose of the Tar River Baptist Association is to glorify God by assisting each of its participating congregations to be in fellowship, and to fulfill its mission, individually and together.

I. OPERATING EXPENSES: Services, utilities, and equipment are essential in assisting the association to fulfill its purpose. Although these things are not identified as ministries, they compliment and lend support to the ministries of the association.

\$ 550.00	ASSOCIATIONAL ANNUALS: Associational Annuals will be printed and distributed to the churches of the association. Churches requesting copies will be required to pay the printing cost of the copies they receive. The Association will provide copies to be mailed to certain institutions and agencies, and a sufficient number of copies to be filed and to be used with committees and new pastors or staff.
\$ 100.00	BANK SERVICE CHARGES: Money is allocated to cover normal banking service charges.
\$ 250.00	BUILDING REPAIRS: These funds will be used to make necessary repairs to the Tar River Baptist Association's building.
\$ 100.00	CARDS (BIRTHDAY, ANNIVERSARY, AND SYMPATHY): Cards will be sent to each minister and each member of his family on the occasions of birthdays, anniversaries, and bereavement.
\$ 1,000.00	CCM TRAVEL REIMBURSEMENT: The CCM Director is reimbursed for all business travel up to a maximum of \$1,000 annually. It is understood that all of this allocation may not be used.
\$ 500.00	COMPUTER SOFTWARE AND SUPPLIES: Necessary software and supplies will be provided for efficiency and effectiveness in the work of the association.
\$ 1,000.00	COPIER SERVICE: Budget covers cost of contract on Canon copier. The contract covers everything except paper.
\$ 250.00	CUSTODIAL SUPPLIES: Cleaning supplies will be provided to maintain the Associational Center. Such items include cleaning materials, deodorizers, disinfectants, waxes, paper towels, toilet tissue, light bulbs, mops, brooms, rags, and other necessary items.
\$ 400.00	EQUIPMENT REPAIR: This estimated amount is allocated since we do not know the extent of the repairs our equipment will need.
\$ 500.00	HOSPITALITY: The Director of Missions may access this fund to provide lodging, food, and other necessary hospitality for associational guests. He may also use these monies for breakfast, luncheon, or dinner meetings with pastors or lay persons that he feels are necessary to the work or fellowship of the association (including orientation sessions with new ministers or staff).
\$ 300.00	KITCHEN SUPPLIES: Paper products (plates, napkins, cups, table coverings) and plastic dinner ware are needed for meals and/or refreshments that are served in connection with meetings held in our facility. Budgeted funds will be used to keep a stock of these supplies.

\$	300.00	MEMORIALS: Budget is used to send flowers or other appropriate items at the death or serious illness of those who are serving in responsible places of leadership. Consideration will also be given to those who have served
		significantly in the past.
\$	300.00	NEW EQUIPMENT: Allocated funds in this line item will be used for the purchase of new equipment. All purchases will be made only with the approval of the Finance Committee.
\$	5,000.00	OFFICE INSURANCE: Insurance coverage includes contents, liability, workman's compensation, malpractice, and bonding for the secretary, treasurer, and assistant treasurer.
\$	1,500.00	OFFICE SUPPLIES: Budget will provide funds for the necessary supplies to adequately do the work of the association.
\$	5,000.00	OFFICE UTILITIES: These funds will be used to pay for electricity, water, and fuel for the Associational Center.
\$	1,900.00	PAYROLL TAXES: Budget provides the association's portion of Social Security taxes for the Secretary and the CCM Director.
\$	50.00	PETTY CASH: Twenty dollars is kept in the office to cover returned mail and other incidentals. The Secretary keeps receipts on all petty cash expenditures.
\$	2,800.00	POSTAGE: Postage will be provided for promotional mailings, other correspondence, and a few copies of "CURRENTS OF THE TAR."

DIAPER CHANGE AND CUP OF COLD WATER MINISTRY: A tent/booth 300.00 will be set up for parents to change the diapers of their children. We will also make cold water available. Volunteers will be available to offer Bibles, tracts, and information about the Tar River Baptist Association. Functions where this ministry will be performed include Louisburg's Tar River Festival (September 16), and Spring Hope's Pumpkin Festival (October 7). 6,000.00 HISPANIC MINISTRY (FRANKLINTON): The budgeted amount is a contribution toward the salary for the Pastor of the mission. Through a Cooperative Agreement, the NC Baptist State Convention will provide \$4,000 of this budgeted amount (to be paid in monthly installments). HISPANIC MINISTRY (VICTORIA EN CRISTO): The budgeted amount 6,600.00 is a contribution toward the salary for the Hispanic pastor. Through a Cooperative Agreement, the NC Baptist State Convention will provide \$3,600 of this amount (to be paid in monthly installments). DAMASCUS ROAD BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP: These funds will be used 1,200.00 to assist with the rental cost of the worship facility and to supplement the pastor's salary. VI. SHORT-TERM MISSION MINISTRIES: Our association is made of people from varied backgrounds and cultures. People with special needs must not be overlooked. We will provide training to help meet the needs of people with special needs and persons of other cultures. 1,939.00 TRAINING IN CONVERSATIONAL SPANISH: Our goal is to teach people the simplest way to converse in Spanish in an effort to share our concerns and kindness, and the love of God. These monies, which will be used to compensate an instructor, have been provided by the Baptist State Convention through a cooperative agreement. TRAINING IN DEAF INTERPRETATION: These funds will be used \$ 1,504.00 to provide an instructor and necessary materials for those who want to learn to communicate with our silent friends. The entire amount in this line item has been provided by the Baptist State Convention through a cooperative agreement. 1,000.00 TUTORIAL MINISTRY: This is a missions outreach program. Committed Christian volunteers will help children with basic academic skills as an expression of Christ's love and concern. Budgeted funds will be used for such things as instructional materials and refreshments. Volunteers will be used as tutors. The total amount in this line item is provided by the Baptist State Convention through a cooperative agreement.

VII. PARTNERSHIP MISSIONS: In cooperation with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, we will partner with other countries and states in an effort to be mutually helpful in establishing new churches and strengthening the work of existing churches.

\$ 1,000.00	ALASKA: The Baptist State Convention will enter into a partnership with Alaska in January, 2000. Funding in this line item will enable us to be involved in that partnership.
\$ 3,550.00	SOUTH AFRICA: During the years of this partnership the association will send one person or assist several persons who want to participate in a project but cannot do so without financial assistance. Some of these funds may also be used for project materials.
\$ 1,500.00	STATESIDE: These funds will be used when our association is requested to partner with another association or church somewhere in the USA to provide assistance with construction, building repairs, disaster cleanup, training, or other specialized help. These monies may be used to assist people who want to participate or with other costs associated with specific projects.

VIII. SEMINARY EXTENSION: Within our association there are both ministers and lay persons who want to know more about the Bible and to be more effective in their service to the Master. Seminary Extension is an ideal way to provide that kind of training at times that can accommodate the schedules of those who work and those who don't.

-0-SEMINARY EXTENSION: We plan to begin Seminary Extension classes during the year 2000. Through a cooperative agreement, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina has agreed to fully fund this activity.

IX. MINISTERIAL EDUCATION: Continuing educational opportunities are often available that some of our pastors are unable to attend because of lack of funds. Through this phase of our budget we will be able to offer partial scholarships to pastors who want to attend but have no church budgeted or personal funding to make it happen.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION: The total amount in this line item 300.00 has been provided by the Baptist State Convention through a cooperative agreement.

X. THE FUTURES PROJECT: Tar River has joined with four other Northeastern Associations in a futures project we were asked to pilot for the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. It could become a workable model for the Convention to use in determining and funding mission ministries across the state.

FUTURES PROJECT: All of the money in this line item will be \$ 6,850.00 provided by the Baptist State Convention.

XI. PERSONNEL EXPENSES: The on-going, day-to-day planning, administration, coordination, and office work of the Association lends support to all associational ministries. There is also necessary custodial maintenance of the associational building and property.

Three rocks beside her trailer house warned four-year-old Mamie not to tell anyone of the way her father was abusing her. If she ever told, her father said, those stones would mark her grave and the graves of her two best "He had already killed my dog," says Mamie, now 16. "So I believed him."

When authorities discovered Mamie's abuse at the hands of her father, she was taken from him. He was charged, but released on bond. He came to the house where Mamie was staying to kill the people in the house...and her. But he was subdued. She heard him through the wall threaten her death while she cowered inside.

Mamie's mother, who left the family when Mamie was six weeks old, attended her father's trial, but only "to see if Mamie looked like me." Mamie never saw her.

George and Linda Hogan, believing "every child deserves a childhood," took Mamie in and raised her as their own. They met her while delivering communion elements to her grandmother.

"It's been a struggle, but you do the best you can," said Linda, who suffers with diabetic ulcers. After her 71-year-old husband had a second heart attack, Mamie became too much for the couple to handle.

She lives now at Moody Home, a structured values change home for girls in Franklin, one of 13 facilities operated by Baptist Children's Homes of North

Carolina.

Mamie pressed the boundaries of love, and George and Linda weren't physically

able to pull her back to safety.

"I tried to push the boundaries a little further and a little further, to see how far I could push before they snapped. Finally, they couldn't take it anymore," Mamie said.

Baptist Children's Homes serve families who "can't take it anymore," who have

children or grandchildren whose behaviors are out of bounds.

In 1998-99 BCH served 1,646 children and their families through 13 facilities statewide. BCH operates residential campuses in Thomasville, Pembroke, Kinston and Clyde; a maternity home in Asheville; a teen mother/baby home in Lenoir; values change homes for girls in Franklin and Lenoir; therapeutic camping in Cameron; crisis cottages at the residential campuses and in Waynesville; and model day care in Thomasville.

Beginning with Easter 1999 and continuing through Thanksgiving 2000, BCH instituted a 20-month institutional emphasis of "Quality Service Through Quality Relationships." Michael C. Blackwell, president since 1983, is "committed to keeping our staff and our services fresh and vital to meet ever-changing needs."

The emphasis places top priority on relationships to achieve the highest quality of service possible. The QSTQR operating theme will permeate every action,

program and effort within the institution and without.

The word "quality" has been overused and under-realized, and it too often cloaks mediocrity with imagined value. There will be no such veneer at BCH.

BCH moved its Odum Home campus in Pembroke ahead to meet new challenges when on April 27 it dedicated two major campus renovations. Space for 10 boys was added to the old "main" building which was named Luther and Audrey Carter Hall, in honor of the donor couple who left their estate to BCH.

The former house used for a director's residence was renovated to serve five girls in transitional care and named for longtime trustees and supporters Abe and

Jackie Elmore.

Total renovations increased capacity at Odum Home from 28 residents to 45. Additionally, 10 day students from Pembroke Middle School will be served at the Winifred Lindsay Education/Administrative Center. These students have issues to resolve that do not require them to be in residential care.

At Cameron Boys Camp May 4, two important staff lodges were dedicated: the A.J. Fletcher Lodge and the Hubert M. Craig Lodge. These lodges provide staff housing, a rare commodity in wilderness setting in which Cameron Boys Camp operates.

The Baptist Foundation

The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in increasing an awareness among North Carolina Baptists of Christian estate stewardship principles as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased financial support. The Foundation accomplishes these objectives by offering assistance in estate planning counsel, will preparation, planned giving, charitable remainder trusts, endowment funds and church fund management.

During 1998, the Foundation provided assistance to individuals in establishing 28 endowment funds and 11 charitable remainder trusts totaling \$1.4 million and received \$3.8 million in contributions to existing endowments all of which will ultimately benefit countless Baptist causes on a permanent basis. Programs were provided for 94 churches and associations during the year to promote Make Your Will Month, Christian estate stewardship, and church fund management. Some \$639,000 from churches came under management to enhance numerous church ministries including

scholarships, building funds, cemetery funds, benevolence funds, general operating

funds and other various mission causes.

The Foundation employs professional money managers to invest these funds according to an investment policy adopted by its Board. Four investment pools are offered: a growth fund, a balanced fund, an income fund and a fixed income fund. During the third quarter of 1998, the Foundation enhanced its position even more by engaging the services of Salomon Smith Barney to help select top money managers in the country.

As of December 31,1998, the Foundation held \$80,874,628 under management. This is an increase of more than \$8 million over 1997. During 1998, \$1,741,923 was distributed to individuals and \$2,772,599 to Baptist work for a total distribution of \$4,514,522. During the 79-year history of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., \$14,217,160 has been distributed to individuals and \$22,305,008 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$36,522,168.

HOSPITAL CARRIES THE TRADITION

In May of 1999, the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. celebrated 76 years of service to the community and region. During these years the Hospital has been faithful to the vision of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. When the Hospital was birthed, the Convention stated the reason for doing so was: to extend the healing ministry which was demonstrated by Jesus Christ. Many challenges have been faced through these years, but the commitment to compassionately strive for innovative excellence has remained the same.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

Baptist churches from all across North Carolina joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the NC Baptist State Convention in 1924. In 1998 the MDO amounted to \$530,874. It was used exclusively to help patients who had little or no health care insurance or no other financial means to pay their hospital bills. From the offering this past year, well over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our Baptist churches in North Carolina. May God bless all those who supported us with prayers and gave so generously.

DIVISION OF PASTORAL CARE

During the year, the Department of Chaplaincy and Pastoral Education provided worship services in Davis Chapel on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday, as well as services in the J. Paul Sticht Center. Chaplain supervisors, residents and interns made more than 50,000 ministry contacts last year. Seventy-five students graduated from the Department's fully accredited Clinical Pastoral Education program. Maurice Briggs retired from the Department in February after 30 years of service. He was known throughout the Hospital for his pastoral presence and the depth of his sensitivity and care.

The Department of Pastoral Counseling/CareNet, Inc. continues to expand its ministries. There are now 13 Christian counseling centers located in strategic areas from Franklin to Wilmington. During the year these professionally staffed

centers will provide over 26,000 hours of Christian counseling.

The Center for Congregational Health, Inc. continues to expand its mission of helping congregations become healthier communities of faith. Programs and assistance offered to churches include: Consultation, Intentional Interim Ministry, and Leadership Development. Resources for ministers include: Young Leaders Program, Leadership Development Group, Interim Ministry Training, and Intentional Interim Ministry training.

FACTS ABOUT WAKE FOREST UNIVERSITY BAPTIST MEDICAL CENTER

- . With more than 11,000 employees, four restaurants, two banks and a post office that handles more mail than some towns, the Medical Center has been called a citywithin-a-city. We are the largest employer in Forsyth and Guilford counties.
- . The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated has opened BestHealth, a community health information center, at Hanes Mall in Winston-Salem. The center will provide a library of books, audio and videotapes, limited Internet access, computer software and a variety of on-site programs to help area residents become better informed about their health and how to remain well.

. Building strong relationships with the community is important to us. A recent survey indicates that Medical Center employees donate more than 30,000 hours of volunteer service a year to more than 300 different organizations in our area. POINTS OF EMPHASIS AND PROGRESS

Gamma Knife - The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated will have the only one in the state by this fall. Patients with inoperable or inaccessible brain lesions benefit from the availability of this noninvasive procedure that gives the same results as surgery but with no need to open the skull or make an incision. This procedure has been found to be three times more effective in treating recurrent cancerous brain tumors than other radiosurgical tools. The Gamma Knife uses radiation to destroy tumors, vascular malformations and other benign brain lesions with pinpoint accuracy without destroying healthy, normal tissue.

Trauma Center - The Medical Center has the only designated Level I trauma center for northwest North Carolina. In the trauma center our goal is for the patient who needs surgery to be in an operating room 10 minutes after arriving at the Emergency Department. Surgeons, anesthesiologists and staff remain on duty 24 hours a day to handle such emergencies.

NASCAR - The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. is working with Motor Racing Outreach (MRO) to serve the fitness and rehabilitation needs of NASCAR Winston Cup Racing. A mobile fitness and rehabilitation unit is being provided for NASCAR Winston Cup drivers, crews, and families.

Ranked Among the Nation's Best - The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. is among the nation's best hospitals in ten of 16 specialities, according to rankings published in the July 1999 issue of *U.S. News & World Report*. These 10 areas are: cancer, cardiology and heart surgery, geriatrics, gynecology, neurology/neurosurgery, orthopaedics, otolaryngology, rheumatology, digestive tract, and urology.

Newest Treatment for Epilepsy - Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center offers a new treatment for epilepsy - a "pacemaker for the brain" that can help control seizures in patients who are not helped by medication and are ineligible for surgery. The Biblical Recorder is the official news journal of North Carolina Baptists. The earliest version of the Recorder was founded in 1833 by Thomas Meredith, who had also been influential in the birth of the Baptist State Convention in 1830. The Biblical Recorder was owned and operated as a private enterprise in support of Baptist work in North Carolina until 1938, when the paper was purchased by the Baptist State Convention and incorporated as an agency of the convention.

A number of able editors have served the Biblical Recorder, which is widely acknowledged to be in the top echelon of state Baptist papers. The current editor is

Tony W. Cartledge, whose tenure began on January 1, 1999.

The Biblical Recorder plays a strategic role in promoting God's kingdom work through North Carolina Baptists. On April 22, 1999, the Board of Directors of the Biblical Recorder adopted the following mission statement: "Our Mission is to further Christ's kingdom by providing relevant news, insightful opinions and supportive resources to North Carolina Baptists in a timely and accessible fashion."

The Biblical Recorder belongs to all North Carolina Baptists and appropriately reflects the geographical, ecclesiological, and theological diversity that is typical of the churches making up the Baptist State Convention. The editors and staff of the Recorder work diligently to offer a fair and balanced presentation of the news that most affects the life and ministry of North Carolina Baptists. Opinions advanced through editorials, letters, and analytical essays help to spark the thinking of North Carolina Baptists who want to make up their own minds about important issues. Feature stories about notable or innovative activities of churches and associations, regular reports on partnership missions efforts, and weekly commentaries on the most popular Sunday School lessons offer ideas, encouragement, and inspiration to readers of the Recorder.

To communicate more effectively and to present the most important news in a more timely fashion, the Biblical Recorder has developed a popular presence on the World Wide Web. The Recorder's website at hhtp://www.biblicalrecorder.org offers Internet users an opportunity to read much of each paper's content several days before printed versions arrive. This is particularly helpful during convention meetings and at other times when frequent updates are desirable. It is a joy for the Christian Action League of North Carolina to serve the churches of this great state. We continue to work to inform the Christian community about the moral issues that face our state and nation. Our goal is to address these issues with the principles of God's Word, the cornerstone of all truth.

A. Christian Values

- . It was the pleasure of the Christian Action League to be one of the sponsors of the Fourth Annual Christian Heritage Week of NC held in March. The League encouraged schools, churches and communities to recognize, commemorate and learn about the Christian heritage and history of our nation. CAL assisted in sponsoring a state-wide essay contest for high school students (public, private and home schools) and presented the state winners with awards for excellence.
- Continued to promote Christian citizenship throughout the churches and communities of our state. CAL has distributed over 14,000 copies of the Ten Commandments to churches, businesses, schools and homes across North Carolina. Promoted Sanctity of Human Life Sunday and the National Day of Prayer statewide.
- . Held a Church Leadership Legislative Day on April 6, 1999. The purpose of this day was to have pastors and church leaders to come together and enjoy fellowship, meet and hear some of our legislators and become more aware of how state government and the legislative process works.
- Promoted awareness of the worldwide persecution of Christians through faxes, emails, and newsletter.

B. Gambling

Lottery proponents continue in their efforts to bring a state-sponsored lottery to North Carolina. Four lottery bills were introduced this session. CAL monitors these efforts and updates the Christian community on lottery information through letters, calls, and our fax and electronic mail networks. Lawmakers have continued to receive a barrage of communications from across the state saying that the lottery is a bad bet for North Carolina.

Sex Education

Worked with other Christian and pro-family groups to see that the state mandate for Abstinence Until Marriage education is implemented state-wide. Also, supported efforts to insure that federal grant money designated to promote abstinence education was used properly. Informed citizens and legislators concerning attempts to fund school-based clinics in North Carolina schools.

Abortion

CAL monitored SB 349/HB 1066 (Act to Ban Partial Birth Abortion); this legislation would have made this type of abortion a class H felony for anyone who performed the late-term procedure. This bill died in committee. Successfully encouraged legislators to limit the State Abortion Fund to cases resulting only from rape, incest and the life of the mother. In the last four years, only one abortion has occurred under these circumstances using tax-payer funds.

Alcohol

CAL monitored all legislation concerning alcohol and other drugs. Successfully supported efforts to strengthen DWI laws. Assisted communities in organizing committees to fight alcohol and drug abuse. Informed citizens statewide about legislation that would have approved alcohol sales without the vote of the people. Four bills were introduced this session that would have permitted alcohol sales with a voter referendum; SB 17, SB 173, SB 606, SB 607 and HB 1043. Provided awareness, education and resource materials related to substance abuse problems to churches, communities, etc.

F. Pornography

Worked against HB 1248 which would have allowed individuals to perform in the nude if it "occurs as part of a play, dance performance or artistic creation that contains serious literary, artistic, political or scientific value." The bill died in committee.

G. Homosexuality

CAL supports efforts to strengthen the traditional family and continues to monitor and inform the public about the activities of those who promote the radical homosexual agenda. HB 884 and SB's 701, 884 and 759 were all introduced to promote the acceptance of homosexuality as an alternative lifestyle. CAL with other likeminded organizations fought these bills and they were defeated. Worked against HB 1398 (Needle Exchange Program) which would have allowed the state to furnish free needles to drug users using tax-payer dollars.

Gifts to the Cooperative Program assist in helping our institutions fulfill their missions. Members from cooperating churches are eligible, as a result, to be considered for scholarships to attend one of our colleges or universities. In addition, North Carolina Baptists who meet the admission requirements for the divinity schools at Campbell and Gardner-Webb Universities are eligible to receive \$8,100 grants toward their theological education. Students who choose to attend another divinity school are eligible to receive \$3,000 toward their educational expenses. All of these are made possible as a result of gifts presented to the Cooperative Program of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. As Dr. Royston wrote, "Baptist colleges are still a priority of our state Convention. It is my hope and dream that more and more students from our churches will attend our schools and graduate as leaders for our state and nation, as well as for our churches."

Our colleges and universities share Dr. Royston's hope and dream. They, too, believe graduates from our campuses will make a difference in our state, nation, and Convention.

BYLAWS of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc.

PREAMBLE

The name of this body shall be the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Corporation to promote the Kingdom of God on earth in compliance with New Testament principles; and to encourage cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention; and to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches; and to carry out properly these purposes and other necessary purposes and activities of the Corporation.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. There shall be two (2) classes of membership in the Corporation: voting and non-voting. The non-voting membership shall be composed of all of the members of the churches affiliated with the Corporation. Voting members of the Corporation shall be known as messengers and shall be elected annually by each of the individual churches affiliated with the Corporation in accordance with the following schedule: Each church is entitled to four (4) messengers. Any church whose resident membership exceeds two hundred (200) is entitled to two (2) additional messengers per one hundred (100) members (or major fraction thereof) in excess of two hundred (200). No church shall be entitled to more than ten (10) messengers.

SECTION 2. Messengers representing a majority of the churches of the

Corporation shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The Corporation shall meet bi-annually in the fall and

SECTION 3. The Corporation shall meet bi-annually in the fall and spring. The fall session shall be primarily for business and the spring session primarily for inspiration. The annual sermon shall be delivered during the spring session.

ARTICLE IV - RECEPTION OF CHURCHES INTO THE CORPORATION

Baptist churches seeking affiliation with this body, upon petition by letter and by messengers, and after satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith and approval by a Credentials Committee, may be admitted into this Corporation by a majority vote, whereupon the Moderator and the Director of Missions shall give the messengers thereof the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF THE CHURCHES OF THE CORPORATION

It shall be the duty of the churches to correspond annually with the
Corporation by filing the Annual Church Profile; to send messengers to the bi-annual
meetings of the Corporation; to give full statistical information and also facts
concerning their general welfare; and to send contributions to pay the expenses of
the Corporation. The Corporation Secretary (known as the Clerk) shall furnish the
churches with the necessary printed forms and/or software for their Annual Church
Profiles. These materials are to be distributed to the churches at least six (6)
weeks before the Annual Fall Session of the Corporation. The churches are requested
to have the Church Profiles in the hands of the Clerk not less than two weeks before
the fall meeting of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VI - POWERS AND PREROGATIVES OF THE CORPORATION

SECTION 1. The Corporation shall have no right to infringe upon thesovereignty of rights of churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature nor a court of appeals. It may advise the churches and recommend measures for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purposes, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

SECTION 2. The Corporation may dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that treats with contempt the purposes and requirements of the Corporation, or that applies for its own dismissal. The Corporation may also dissolve connection with any church that does not file a Church Profile or have messengers attending its Annual Fall Meetings for two (2)

consecutive years.

ARTICLE VII - OFFICERS

The officers of the Corporation shall be: Director of Missions, Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Trustees.

ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to lead the Corporation to fulfill its mission faithfully, effectively, and lovingly. His role is three-dimensional: (1) mission strategist, (2) minister to the churches, pastors, and other church staff members, and (3) general leader of the Corporation. Within the limits of his time and ability, he is to respond to the invitation of churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to assist in the formation of fields with resident pastors; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. By virtue of his office he shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special committees authorized by the Corporation.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Clerk (also known as the Secretary) to provide administrative support services to the Director of Missions and to the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. It shall also be the duty of the Clerk to record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the bi-annual meetings and of the Executive Board, and to make this information available on request. The Clerk shall use all diligence to have the record of transactions printed and distributed to the churches as soon as possible; and to distribute to the church clerks reminders about, and forms for, the Annual Church Profile. The Clerk shall also serve as exofficio Secretary of the Executive Board.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to plan for and preside over the bi-annual and called meetings of the Corporation and the quarterly Executive Board meetings, and to encourage fellowship and mutual care among the churches. shall open the meetings punctually at the time appointed, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. The Moderator shall appoint a Parliamentarian to serve at each meeting of the Corporation and the Executive Board Meetings. He shall also serve as ex-officio chairman of the Executive Board. Moderator shall be ineligible for more than two (2) one-year terms in succession.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the Vice Moderator to assist in developing fellowship and mutual care among the churches and church leaders. He shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in the Moderator's absence, serve as vicechairman of the Executive Board, and serve as Chairman of the Executive Council.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to assist in receiving, accounting, and disbursing of all the Corporation's monies as authorized by the Corporation or the Executive Board. By virtue of his office, the Treasurer shall be

an ex-officio member of the Finance Committee.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to act as the legal agents of the Corporation and shall hold title of all property of the Corporation. In the name of the Corporation they shall be authorized and empowered to receive title to real and personal property, and to sell and convey or mortgage same upon authority duly given by the Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. They are also responsible for keeping an updated inventory of all equipment owned by the Corporation, a copy of which is to be kept on file in the Corporation's Office. Trustees are to be three (3) in number, and they are to serve for a term of three (3) years. The terms of Trustees are to be staggered, with each Trustee having the privilege of succeeding to another term.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

The Committees of the Corporation are administrative in nature. These administrative Committees are as follows: Nominating; Credentials; Finance; Resolutions; Time, Place, and Preacher; Program; Bylaws; Christian Education; Strategy; Properties; History; and others deemed necessary or desirable. Each Committee shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. Committee members shall serve for a term of one year. Such tenure of office shall begin immediately upon the adjournment of the Annual Fall Meeting of the Corporation. Members are allowed to serve more than one term in succession.

ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES
SECTION 1. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to nominate all officers, leaders, committeemen, and council representatives with the exception of the Director of Missions, the Clerk, and any other paid employees. This committee is to be appointed by the Moderator, and shall retain at least two (2) of its members from the preceding year.

SECTION 2. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in determining when churches are of like faith and order, and when they can be properly accepted in the fellowship of the Corporation. It is also the duty of this committee to receive the list of messengers from the individual churches and to designate these messengers and other

members of the Corporation as voting members of the Corporation.

SECTION 3. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons, whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in securing, administering, and reporting its finances. This committee will plan and propose an annual budget to the Executive Board and suggest to the churches the amount necessary to meet the said budget. This committee shall counsel with the Treasurer concerning expenditures and determination of priorities of budget items. At least two (2) of its members shall be retained from the preceding year. The Treasurer will serve as an ex-officio member of this committee.

SECTION 4. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to assist the Corporation in studying resolutions for adoption by the Corporation or the Executive Board. This committee will also prepare suitable resolutions expressing the Corporation's feelings in regard to the biannual meetings, officers of the Corporation, host churches, and other matters.

SECTION 5. The TIME, PLACE, and PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) persons whose duty it will be to suggest a time, place, and preacher for the bi-

annual meetings of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of all elective officers of the Corporation and the host pastors of the bi-annual meetings. It shall be their duty to assist the Corporation in planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Corporation. They shall receive program recommendations from a preliminary Study Committee (composed of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Director of Missions), draft and present the program in printed form for the bi-annual meetings which, upon the adoption by the Corporation, shall become its order of business.

SECTION 7. The BYLAWS COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to make recommendations relative to Bylaw changes. This Committee shall receive all proposed changes and/or amendments to the Bylaws of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc., and upon study of said changes and/or amendments make recommendations to the Corporation concerning said changes and/or amendments.

SECTION 8. The CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to keep before the churches of the Corporation

all matters pertaining to the ministry of Christian Education.

SECTION 9. The STRATEGY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in determining strategic objectives and

staying on course in achieving them.

SECTION 10. The PROPERTIES COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to assist the Corporation in properties administration. Committee shall develop and recommend policies and procedures for using the Corporation's facilities and equipment.

SECTION 11. The HISTORY COMMITTEE shall be composed of five (5) members whose duty it shall be to gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the

Corporation's life and work.

ARTICLE XI - INSTITUTIONAL AND AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES

The Denomination's Institutional and Agency Representatives shall include the following: Annuity Board, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes, Christian Higher Education, Religious Literature, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Missions. The representatives for these institutions and agencies shall be responsible for providing information to the churches during the year, and/or giving reports on the work of the institutions and agencies at the biannual meetings of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XII - MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS The Mission Performance Councils undergird and give support to the work of program-related ministries of the Corporation. Training leadership shall be a primary responsibility of these Councils. All Mission Performance Councils shall be under the supervision of the Executive Board. These Mission Performance Councils

are as follows: Seminary Extension, Ordination Advisory, Music, Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Vacation Bible School, Recreation, Media Library, Pastoral Ministries, Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions Development, Youth Ministry, and Family Ministry.

ARTICLE XIII - DUTIES OF THE MISSION PERFORMANCE COUNCILS

SECTION 1. The SEMINARY EXTENSION COUNCIL shall direct any Seminary Extension Program for the churches affiliated with the Corporation. This Council shall be

composed of at least five (5) members.

SECTION 2. The ORDINATION ADVISORY COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to act only in an advisory capacity for churches seeking assistance in examining prospective candidates approved for ordination. This Council shall conduct its work within the guidelines of the Corporation.

The MUSIC COUNCIL shall be composed of at least five (5) members. SECTION 3. This Council shall plan and implement the music program of the Corporation. They shall recommend to the Program Committee the music for the bi-annual meetings, and

they shall enlist accompanists for all Corporation meetings.

SECTION 4. The SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team (ASSISTeam) and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of the ASSISTeam to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate Sunday School Work. [Note: Name changed to ACTeam -Associational Consultant Team]

SECTION 5. The DISCIPLESHIP SUPPORT TEAM shall be composed of at least two (2) members and any needed special emphasis personnel. It shall be the responsibility of this team to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the total Discipleship

Ministry of the Corporation.

SECTION 6. The WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION shall consist of the leadership recommended by the WMU Nominating Committee and elected by the Corporation's WMU. This Council will have the responsibility of planning, promoting, conducting, and evaluating WMU work.

SECTION 7. The BROTHERHOOD COUNCIL shall be composed of the officers of the Corporation's Brotherhood. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to help plan, promote, conduct, and evaluate the work of Baptist Men and also the work of

Royal Ambassadors.

SECTION 8. The VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) The Vacation Bible School Council Director is the leader of the VBS Team members. and shall plan and promote the Corporation's VBS Clinics. The age-group VBS leaders who comprise this team shall be responsible for conducting the VBS Clinics.

SECTION 9. The RECREATION COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members whose duty it shall be to help plan, coordinate, promote, and conduct the entire recreation program of the Corporation. They shall be available to assist any entity of the Corporation with the planning and conducting of recreational activities. The work of this Council includes setting up and supervising the Basketball Program and any other Sports Program that may be started. This Council will also plan, promote, and conduct the Annual Royal Ambassador Track Meet and the Annual Royal Ambassador Car Competition.

The MEDIA LIBRARY COUNCIL shall consist of at least three (3) SECTION 10. members. This Church Media Library Organization is often referred to as TACMO. shall be the responsibility of this Council to provide for the mutual sharing of inspiration and information for furthering the Church Media Center Ministry of the

affiliated churches.

SECTION 11. The PASTORAL MINISTRIES COUNCIL shall be composed of the following: (1) Pastoral Ministries Director, (2) Church Administration Services Coordinator, (3) Deacon Ministry Coordinator, (4) Vocational Guidance Coordinator, and (5) Church Weekday Education Coordinator, and any others that may be deemed necessary or advisable. The duties of this Council shall be to determine the pastoral ministries emphasis needed or desired and to schedule the events in cooperation with the total programming of the Corporation. The major task of the Council shall be the development and training of ministers through conferences, workshops, clinics, awareness meetings, retreats, and ministry support groups.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COUNCIL shall consist of at least five (5) members. It shall be the duty of this Council to plan and promote any evangelism programs, training projects, and rallies needed or desired. It shall also be the responsibility of this Council to keep evangelism before the pastors and laypeople

of the Corporation.

SECTION 13. The STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for stewardship development and promotion within or among the churches of the Corporation. It will be the task of this Council to seek to lead the churches to set specific, attainable, measurable stewardship goals.

SECTION 14. The MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall consist of at least seven (7) members. This Council shall be responsible for missions development in the total program of the Corporation. The Council shall not only be concerned with already established missions, mission work, and mission activities; it shall be concerned with beginning new mission work. It will be their responsibility to study the missionary needs of the Corporation and make recommendations concerning new work. They shall also recommend missions projects or activities with which the churches in the Corporation may cooperate. They shall strive to get each church in the Corporation to elect or appoint a Church Mission Development Council.

SECTION 15. The YOUTH MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for planning youth related ministries for the Corporation

including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

SECTION 16. The FAMILY MINISTRY COUNCIL, composed of at least five (5) members, shall be responsible for helping to plan, promote, and conduct any program emphasis related to family life. This Council should strive to include the needs of senior adults, single adults, marriage partners, parents, and children.

ARTICLE XIV - THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL
The Executive Council shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, the Directors of the various Program Councils, and three members at large. It shall be the responsibility of this Council to assist the Director of Missions in planning, coordinating, promoting, and executing the Corporation's programs, making recommendations to the Executive Board or to the Corporation in its Annual Fall Meeting. It shall also be the duty of this Council to plan the annual calendar. This Council shall meet quarterly on another Monday evening prior to each Executive Board meeting, and at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or Moderator.

ARTICLE XV - THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Corporation officers and key leaders from each participating church. These key leaders shall be: Pastor, Associate Pastor, Chairman of Deacons, WMU Director, Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, and Librarian. All Executive Board Members shall be members of the church they represent. If a church does not have one or more of these leaders, it may appoint a substitute for each vacancy and shall submit the name/names with the church profile.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall meet quarterly usually during March, June, September, and November on Monday night following the fourth Sunday of the month unless a conflict necessitates moving the meeting to Monday after the third or fifth Sunday. The Executive Board may meet at other times at the call of the Director of Missions and/or the Moderator for the purpose of transacting special or

urgent business.

SECTION 3. Although each church should earnestly strive to get its full contingent of key leaders to attend, there is no quorum requirement for transacting business at a regular or called meeting of the Executive Board.

SECTION 4. The Director of Missions is an ex-officio member of the Executive

Board and does not have the power to vote.

SECTION 5. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as follows:

The Executive Board is authorized to call a Director of Missions, to determine his salary, and to define his duties.

b. To act for the Corporation between regular sessions of the body.

To encourage the cooperation of churches and pastors in Kingdom causes. d. To keep before the churches the matter of enlistment and the Bible teaching of stewardship.

e. To recommend to the annual meeting of the Corporation the annual budget, to recommend to the churches the raising of the same, and to counsel with the Director

of Missions relative to the program to be fostered by the Corporation.

f. Indebtedness incurred by the Executive Board in the name of the Corporation shall not exceed \$500.00 at any time during the year without specific authorization of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XVI - VISITORS

Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited to sit with the Corporation, and participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting. ARTICLE XVII - AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended during any regular session by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided any proposed amendment shall have been made available to all churches at least two weeks prior to date of the Corporation's meeting. The said amendment(s) must be presented to the afternoon session and voted on no earlier than the evening session.

ARTICLE XVIII - PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES

The business of the Corporation shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE XIX - BUSINESS PROCEDURE

1. The session of the Tar River Baptist Association, Inc. shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

2. An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

3. No one shall undertake to address the body until first recognized by the Moderator as a member of the Corporation or an invited guest.

4. Any person addressing the body must speak on the question under

consideration and avoid discourteous personal remarks.

5. Any person desiring to make a motion must rise, address the Moderator, and be recognized by him. It is not necessary for a messenger to rise to second a motion. Motions must be reduced to writing upon a request of Clerk or Moderator. A nomination does not require a second.

6. The Moderator shall restate motions before discussion is in order.

7. Any resolution to be presented to the Executive Board and/or bi-annual meetings must be put in writing and screened by the Resolutions Committee at least two months prior to the time of the presentation to the Corporation and published in the Corporation's newsletter prior to the meeting. The only exceptions shall be resolutions of appreciation and resolutions honoring individuals for outstanding service.

The Moderator, before discussing a topic or motion, shall designate one member of the body as temporary chairman.

9. Each Fall Session shall decide on the time and place for the next meeting and elect a preacher for the annual sermon.

10. Reports of committees must be brief - not exceeding five hundred words. Other reports should not exceed three hundred words each.

11. The Moderator shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. 12. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Librarian of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina; Biblical Recorder, Raleigh, North Carolina; Southeastern Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina; Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee; and State Baptist Convention.

13. The host churches of the bi-annual meetings shall present brief histories (not more than a thousand words). These histories shall be printed in the annual

- 1. The 170th Semi-Annual Session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called
- to order at 3:30 p.m. by Moderator Tom Eldridge, Bunn Baptist Church.
 2. Interim Director of Missions George Shore led in singing the hymn "He Lives." Mr. James Wheless, Maple Springs Baptist Church, read scripture and led in

4. Rev. Eldridge organized the session and appointed Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock

Baptist Church, as parliamentarian.

5. Vice Moderator Epp Catlett presented the program. He made a motion that the program be adopted with one change: Rev. Mike Blevins, instead of Mrs. Mary Abbott, would present the history of Corinth Baptist Church. Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church seconded the motion, and the vote carried.

6. The histories of the host churches were presented by Mr. Joseph Elmore, Maple

Springs; Rev. Mike Blevins, Corinth; and Mr. Carroll Goodew, Sandy Creek.

7. Dr. Shore led in singing the hymn "Showers of Blessings."

Editor Tony Cartledge gave a report on the Biblical Recorder, the state Baptist paper which began in 1833. He said that the purpose of the paper is to facilitate communication and to give information. The paper is mailed to all the states except South Dakota and to several countries. The Biblical Recorder can also be read on the computer web site.

9. Treasurer Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the monthly financial report for March, 2000, and the annual financial report for 1999. 10. In miscellaneous business, Rev. Eldridge explained that volunteers are needed

to deliver the associational newsletter to several churches. 11. Dr. Shore led in singing the hymn "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart."

- 12. Director of Missions Search Committee Co-Chairman C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church, reported that the committee was elected at the Associational Board Meeting on November 27, 1999. The other members of the committee are Co-Chairman Jimmie Weathers, Louisburg Baptist Church; Mr. Terry Alford, Ephesus Baptist Church; Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock Baptist Church; Mrs. Mary Conn, White Level Baptist Church; Mrs. Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church; Mrs. Elaine Lewis, Pilot Baptist Church; and Rev. Eldon Reich, Bethlehem Baptist Church. On January 11, 2000, the committee met with Bobby Stafford of the NC Baptist State Convention. Mr. Stafford gave the committee a sense of direction and confidence. Dr. Pruette said that after Rev. Bill Wallace's retirement on February 29, 2000, the committee's first order of business was to elect an interim. Dr. George Shore began work March 2, 2000. At the March 27, 2000, Board Meeting it was voted that Dr. Shore will work two days a week (more if necessary), at \$100 a day plus travel expenses. The vote carried. Dr. Pruette said that now the committee is gathering resumes and researching the association to determine a profile for the next Director of Missions. Resumes will be accepted until May 15, 2000. Dr. Pruette closed his report with a welcome to Dr. Shore.

 13. Dr. Shore said that it is a pleasure to serve as interim. He said that Tar River has 170 years of rich history and heritage. The history speaks well of the leadership, the unity, and the fellowship. He said that two significant achievements of the Tar River Baptist Association are the completion of the Associational Missions and Resource Center and the rebuilding and furnishing of five mobile home units for flood victims in North Carolina. He said that Tar River has a missionary spirit. The new century will bring much change and multiple opportunities for evangelism, growth, missions, new church starts, ethnic ministries, and more. He said that we will be able to meet the challenge as we work

cooperatively.

4. Dr. Shore led in singing the hymn "Sunshine In My Soul."

15. Special music was presented by Mrs. Glenda Parrish, Maple Springs Baptist

16. Dr. James Royston presented the report of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. He said that North Carolina Baptists are alive, vibrant, and healthy. He said that over the last two years, 100 new churches a year were started. However, three and one half million people are unchurched today. The churches can make a difference. Many good things are happening, but many people are dying without Christ. He said that investments in God's kingdom will lay up treasures in heaven. The message of the church must never change, but the methods of delivering that message must change to reach the changing needs of the world.

18. Thanksgiving for the evening meal was given by Rev. Johnny Gupton, Maple

Springs Baptist Church.

Evening Session

1. The evening session began with a mini concert. Special music was presented by several members of the Pilot Baptist Church. They were Mr. Jan Alford, Mr. Gus Alford, Mr. Ray Hignutt, Mr. Mike Blickensderfer, Rev. Bill Wallace, and Mr. Dan Bland. Other special music was presented by Mrs. Glenda Parrish, Maple Springs Baptist Church, and Mr. Robert Williams, First Baptist Church, Spring Hope.

2. Moderator Tom Eldridge recognized Ms. Mamie Gupton, Wood Baptist Church, who is

102 years old. He also recognized the newest addition to the association, Saint's Delight Baptist Church and two new pastors, Rev. Jerry Hicks, Maple Springs Baptist

Church, and Rev. Butch Gordon, Samaria Baptist Church.

3. Rev. Mike Blevins, Corinth Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.

4. Dr. Shore shared that in 1997 he went for a regular medical check up and discovered that he had leukemia. During 1997 and 1998 he had three rounds of chemotherapy and spent ninety-eight days in the hospital. Now his leukemia is in remission. He said that three things helped: a support system, prayer and Bible study, and a positive mental attitude. He added that he is delighted to serve in the Tar River Baptist Association.

5. Dr. Shore led in singing the hymn "O Happy Day."

6. Church and Community Ministries Director Gail Nelms began her report by saying welcome to Maple Springs in English. Rev. Mark Cottrell, Pearce Baptist Church, repeated the welcome in Spanish. Mrs. Linda Boulden, Castalia Baptist Church, repeated the welcome in sign language. Mrs. Nelms said that people need hope and we need to share God's hope with them. Mrs. Nelms said that Rev. Cottrell felt compelled, after a mission trip, to cross cultural barriers, and that Mrs. Boulden felt compelled to work with the hearing impaired. Mrs. Nelms said that we need to cross barriers too.

7. Discipleship Supporter Wendy Minton Edwards, First Baptist Church, Spring Hope, said that three others work with her in Associational Discipleship Support. They are Miss Heather Nelms, Centerville Baptist Church; Rev. Mark Cottrell, Pearce

Baptist Church; and Rev. Paul Tolbert, Peachtree Baptist Church. She said that there are many discipleship supporters in Tar River. Several helped with the Real Life Survival Course for youth on April 15. Many helped with the annual deacon dinner and a women's conference. She said that good organizations and good program studies are in the Tar River churches. We can all be discipleship supporters by touching lives and encouraging others. Mrs. Edwards shared the testimony of a lady who was with her at the death of Mrs. Edward's mother. She said that one year later, on the anniversary of the death, this lady contacted her. Mrs. Edwards said that this is a form of discipleship support.

8. Mrs. Kathy Robles, Philadelphia Baptist Church, said that she has been discipled by many people during her Christian walk. Recently a lady in the church helped her and her fiance learn how to get along and to communicate with each other despite the fact that he is Hispanic and she (Mrs. Robles) is not. The Christian lady told Mrs. Robles and her fiance to always put God first. Mrs. Robles said that all people should be discipled and be disciplers whether in a group or one-on-one.

9. Rev. Greg Anderson, First Baptist Church, Spring Hope, shared how a Sunday School leader took time with him as a teenager. Rev. Anderson said that many other people also touched his life. These people were discipleship supporters. He said true discipleship is investing your life in the lives of others.

10. Mrs. Edwards presented a challenge for each one in the association to think of someone that they can intentionally invest their life in and to assist and encourage that person in his/her Christian walk. (Following the Discipleship emphasis the Discipleship Team gave out notepads.)

11. Dr. Shore led in singing the hymn "Pass It On."

12. Rev. Mark Abernathy, NC Baptist Men, gave a report on partnership missions. He said that missions is no longer only done by career missionaries. All Baptists can do hands-on missions. We all have different gifts and should use them. God opened the doors for NC Baptists to partner with families who were Hurricane Floyd victims. NC Baptist Men have partnered over 600 families with families that were victims of the hurricane. In addition, over 800 families have been helped by volunteers.

He said that in 1998, Hurricane Mitch hit Honduras and caused tremendous destruction from flood waters and mud slides. Whole villages were destroyed. Baptist groups went to Honduras to do clean up, to take food, and to rebuild homes. Only twenty percent of the people in Honduras are Baptist.

Rev. Abernathy said that partnership involves building relationships and

witnessing in addition to the labor.

He said that in 1996 North Carolina started sending teams to South Africa. The NC/South Africa partnership will continue until the end of 2001. Some teams worked in the bush and some teams worked in modern cities. Volunteers are still needed.

Rev. Abernathy reported that he recently went with the International Mission Board to Mozambique to access flood damage. Teams went to purify the water and to

distribute seeds to the farmers.

He said that the new North Carolina partnership is with Alaska, a state that only has 103 Baptist congregations. North Carolina Baptists can offer physical labor, money and encouragement to Alaska. About 100 projects have been received, and many of these requests have still not been filled. This partnership is a three-year project. Volunteers will do construction, teach Vacation Bible School, lead revivals, do leadership training, and much more.

In closing Rev. Abernathy said that God opens many doors for Baptists to touch

lives. He requested prayer for the partnerships and for the volunteers.

13. Dr. Shore led in singing the hymn "Footsteps of Jesus."

14. Credentials Committee Chairman Gilford Bufkin, Pilot Baptist Church, reported that attendance at the Spring 2000 meeting was as follows: 32 churches represented by 92 messengers, 6 alternates, 21 pastors, 14 associational officers, and 36 guests

for a total of 169 people.

15. Resolutions Committee Chairman Steven Wade, Poplar Spring Baptist Church, presented the following resolutions:

Resolution 1:

Whereas Maple Springs Baptist Church, being assisted by Corinth Baptist Church and Sandy Creek Baptist Church, has hosted the Tar River Baptist Association Spring Meeting, 2000;

And whereas they have provided their time and place along with good fellowship and food;

Be it therefore resolved that we hereby express to each church our appreciation for their gracious efforts to provide for the needs of all who attended this session of the Tar River Baptist Association.

Resolution 2:

Whereas the leaders of this association have provided the program for this meeting and its place;

Be it therefore resolved that our appreciation be given to our Interim Director of Missions, Dr. George Shore; our Association Secretary, Mrs. Georgette Burnette; our CCM Director, Mrs. Gail Nelms; our Moderator, Rev. Tom Eldridge; our Vice Moderator, Mr. Epp Catlett; to each one who led in worship, and to each one that gave us a committee report.

Resolution 3:

Whereas of February 29, 2000, our Director of Missions, Rev. Bill Wallace

retired;

And whereas he faithfully served the Tar River Baptist Association for 13 years; Be it therefore resolved that we express our gratitude and appreciation for faithful service and leadership and pray the Lord bless him and keep him in all his future endeavors.

Rev. Wade made a motion that the resolutions be approved. The vote carried.

16. Rev. Eldridge read scripture and led in prayer.

17. Special music was presented by Mrs. Rochelle Gilliam and Mrs. Darnell Tingen, both from Flat Rock Baptist Church.

18. Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church, preached the annual sermon.

19. Rev. Jon Dorsey, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, adjourned the meeting with prayer.

History of Maple Springs Baptist Church

The beginnings of Maple Springs Baptist Church are vague. that it began in 1773. However, land for the church was deeded by Elias Stallings on October 13, 1792, to "James Denby and Jacob Jones, commissioners of the Baptist Society in Franklin County." (Deed book 53, page 63, Franklin County Register of Deeds) The recording of the deed was overlooked for eighty-eight years. On January 14, 1880 the deed was duly recorded. Earlier the deed was certified by the NC General Assembly March 14, 1879. The stated intention of the deeding of the land was "for the use of a meeting house for the Baptist society." Apparently, the meeting house was completed the following year, 1793, for the church celebrated its centennial July 27, 1893 (reference <u>The Franklin Times</u>, July 21 and July 28, 1893).

Maple Springs Baptist Church was fully constituted in July, 1793, and in joined the Kehukee Association. The leader in organizing the church was Rev. William Lancaster. The deacons were Jacob Jones, Elisha Denby, and Josiah Ely. In 1831, Maple Springs became a charter member of the Tar River Baptist Association. Rev. Thomas Crocker, a leader in the establishment of the Tar River Association, was the minister of the church at this time. Rev. Crocker served the church for twentytwo years. Between 1832 and 1904, the Association met at Maple Springs five times.

Seven ministers served during the rest of the century.

Two major events that occurred in the 19th century were the building of the present church in 1858 and the Centennial Celebration in 1893. The Centennial Celebration was held July 27, 1893, with Rev. George M. Duke delivering the welcome speech. Rev. Duke served Maple Springs for almost forty years. At the time of his death in 1918, his popularity was so great that the suggestion was made to arrange for the erection of a monument to him on the Courthouse Square. In October 1918, possibly the largest crowd ever gathered at the church in a memorial to the late Rev. Duke. A liberal offering of more than \$4,000 was made by the approximate 3,000

After Rev. Duke's death, a group of ministers referred to as "the Wake Forest boys" served the church. These included W. B. Morton, B. E. Morris, Ira S. Harrell, Sankey L. Blanton, J. S. Hopkins, and J. Clyde Yates. After Rev. C. L. Gillespie, Rev. L. B. Reavis assumed duties as full time pastor in 1935. In 1937, Rev. John Edwards came. During his three years of service, lights were installed in the church. In the early 1940's W. N. Brookshire, R. O. Bennett, and Elmo M. Powell served. During Rev. Powell's tenure, seven Sunday School rooms were added and the

After Rev. Bill Gordon who served in the late 1940's came a number of "seminary men": Wiley C. Guthrie, John Grant, C. H. Norris, J. Parker McLendon, Bufford Raffield, Marvin Bass, Melvyn Salter, A. J. Conyers, and Forest M. Gale. These pastors filled the years between 1952 and 1977 with the longest periods of service being those of Rev. McLendon (5 years), Rev. Raffield (6 years), and Rev. Salter and Rev. Gale (4 years.) During the stay of Rev. Salter, the educational building was dedicated. Built in memory of Mr. Clyde P. Harris and his wife Annie Flemming Harris, the building was made possible through the generosity of their son, Mr. T. Mort Harris. The Harris family generously supported the construction of the pastorium which was completed in 1962 during Rev. Raffield's ministry.

Rev. Michael C. Brooks (1977-1981) ushered the church into the 1980's. A number of physical improvements, including a set of chimes, were made during his ministry. From 1981 to 1988 Rev. Grady W. Edwards served as pastor. Numerous improvements were made in these years, including the addition of a steeple, given by Mr. Jesse Fulghum in memory of his wife and mother. Two outstanding interim pastors served the church in the late 1980's and early 1990's. Rev. Bill Hern served in this capacity twice, and Rev. Gordon Joyner came later. After Rev. Edwards, John Marvin Butler served as pastor between 1989 and 1991, and Rev. Joyner followed as interim. In February, 1992, Rev. Tom Cabaniss became the pastor. From the time of Rev. Cabaniss' departure in 1994 until the year 2000, Rev. Stephen Brock-Loftis and Rev. Paul Lloyd occupied the pulpit. Two interim pastors served in the last six years of the century. They were Rev. Richard D. Smith and Rev. Johnny Gupton.

The church continues to grow. In 1999 a beautiful hall was added to its existing facilities. The contributions of its leaders and its membership to the spiritual growth of the area cannot be measured.

Our prayer is that Maple Springs Baptist Church will continue to grow and to honor and glorify the name of Jesus Christ.

History of Corinth Baptist Church

The history of Corinth dates back to 1785 when the church was known as Toole's Meeting House. Sometime later the name was changed to Crocker's Chapel. When the congregation moved to a location between Rocky Ford and Ingleside, the name became Haywood Meeting House, and later named Haywood Baptist Church.

Following the Civil War, Brother Peter Dement gave the land for the present site. The old Haywood church property was sold to the black Baptists in the community. The name Corinth was chosen when the congregation moved into the first building on this site. A larger frame building erected in 1911 was destroyed by

fire in 1925. Thus the present building was erected.

Many improvements have been made over the years. Following World War II, a central heating system was installed and a unified church budget was also adopted. In 1963 land was given and the parsonage was built. In 1979 the first Minister of Music/Youth was hired. Pew cushions were installed in 1982. Stained glass windows were added in 1986. In 1988-89 Sunday School rooms were renovated. In 1992 the baptistry was installed. In 1995 improvements were made to the church cemetery and outdoor playground equipment was purchased. In 1998 chimes were installed in the steeple.

Ties with the Tar River Association go back 150 years. In 1849 and 1871, the annual meeting was held with the Haywood Baptist Church. The first meeting with Corinth was in 1901. The association meetings returned to Corinth in 1936, 1965, and 1984. At the Annual Meeting in 1993, Corinth's pastor, Dr. Don Dowless, preached the annual sermon. Corinth co-hosted the Association Meeting in 1997.

Corinth Baptist Church can be proud of her 215 year history and can sing "To

God be the glory, great things He has done."

As we look to the future, Corinth Baptist Church is committed to the Southern Baptist way of life, the Southern Baptist Convention and its Articles of Faith. As we move forward we lay a firm hold on the Great Commission and, like the Apostle Paul, we also say, "Let us press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

History of Sandy Creek Baptist Church

Sandy Creek Baptist Church began in the early 1700's. We have copies of original church documents dating back to 1723. In 1743 representatives were sent to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to determine how they would formalize a church in this area. In 1755, the church was established. William Walker, who became pastor of Reedy Creek (our mother church) in 1746, was also the first pastor of Sandy Creek. The original church's "Faith and Covenant" is dated December 6, 1755, in what was then Granville County.

The first church was called the Meeting House at Sandy Creek, and it was later known as the Church of Christ at Sandy Creek. During the 1800's, testimonies of members were vital to the church. The records indicate Christian concern for erring church members, efforts to restore these members to obedience to Christ, and forgiveness for their past actions. In 1826, the pastor, William B. Worrell held a revival, and seventy-six were baptized. Pastor Worrell baptized more than 350 new

Christians before his death in 1832.

The Tar River Baptist Association was organized at Sandy Creek in 1831. The Association's Centennial was held here in 1931 and sesquicentennial in 1981. Many of our church members have held leadership roles in the association over the years.

By 1844, the church membership consisted of 106 white members and 16 black members. In 1862, twelve members were given letters of dismissal to organize a church at Mt. Zion, and in 1906, another twelve members were granted letters of dismissal to organize a church at Dickens, later to become White Level Baptist Church.

In 1940, Wednesday night services began. In 1952, Sunday night services began. In 1954, the church called her first full time Pastor. In 1972, the bus ministry was started, and in August of 1974 the church started Children's Church. In 1989, the men of the church started a food pantry. In 1995, our children started participating in the Bible Drill.

In 1995, we called our pastor, Jon Dorsey. We have a pastoral staff who God is

greatly using: Rob Hester (Youth Pastor) and Matt Dorsey (Music Pastor).

The church started having two morning worship services in February 1999. We have a great emphasis on ministry with more than fifty lay-led ministries. The church also has a great heart for missions with our WMU and Men's Ministry actively ministering at home and abroad. We have recently sent people on mission trips to Cherokee, Supply, Emerald Isle, and Andrews, North Carolina. We have also sent members to West Virginia, New Hampshire, Brazil, Hungary, Romania, Czech Republic, and Russia. We have 28 members going to Russia in June of this year.

We have a heart for evangelism with a church-led area wide crusade every year since 1996. We currently have over thirty members going out sharing the gospel each

week, and the Lord is adding to the church.

The church has unprecedented power in the worship, ministries, and membership, which is a result of many in the church seeking God through prayer. We have a prayer chain that is a 24-hour source of strength to the church and the community. There are numerous weekly prayer meetings in our church family including a youth prayer meeting every Saturday night at eight p.m.

The Lord has blessed our church with a great history, however, our focus is not on the past but the future. We believe God has a great plan for the future of Sandy

Creek Baptist Church.

Associational Executive Board Report

The Associational Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met three times since the Annual Meeting in October 1999. November 29, 1999

Moderator for the session was Tom Eldridge. Forty people representing nineteen churches and one mission were present. Epp Catlett was appointed Parliamentarian.

Finance Committee Chairman Jimmy Weathers presented the October Financial Report. He was concerned that over one half of the churches in the Association were

not represented at the Board meeting.

Director of Missions Bill Wallace added to the report of the Finance Committee that the association depends on the churches for the money spent on mission causes. He said that we are a family and when disaster happens we need to help, but at the same time we need to continue supporting the Association.

Music and Worship Director Nanette Warren announced association-wide Christmas caroling to be held December 21 at the hospital and nursing centers.

Georgette Burnette, reporting for WMU Director Kathy Robles, said that the WMU is involved in a Christmas ministry at the Fountain Correctional Center for Women in Rocky Mount. WMU members will meet at Philadelphia Baptist Church December 3 to pack boxes for the inmates. On December 4 a group will deliver the goodies and host a party for the inmates. She also announced an International Mission Study to be held at Mountain Grove Baptist Church November 30. She said that Camp Mundo Vista, owned and operated by the NC WMU, is in great need of renovations. The Tar River WMU started a campaign to help raise money for Camp Mundo Vista. The goal is \$35 per WMU member.

Charlie Morgan, Pastor at Damascus Road Baptist Fellowship, announced that thirty-five people attended the worship service yesterday. He reported that the previous monetary problems have been solved, and the people are giving offerings. He announced that the mission is moving from its present location in the near future. He reported that last Sunday seven people were baptized. He said that Mike Hopkins is now the Minister of Music. He concluded his report by announcing that a

band has been formed called the "No Hope" Band. Rev. Wallace, reporting for Pastor Elvis Pereira at Victoria en Cristo, reported an average attendance of 85 in Sunday School and 95 in worship. have recently been baptized and six decisions have been made for Christ. reported that a study of the Old Testament has been completed. The Mission will soon be starting a study of the New Testament. He said that three men at the mission are in training to be deacons, and the mission is working to ordain the Music Minister. He shared that Elvis and Lucia are praying about starting a Bible institute for Hispanic lay people in the area to train them in ministry.

Rev. Wallace said that it is a privilege to minister at Lake Royale every Sunday at 8:30 am. The average attendance for these early services is 60-75 people from different denominations. He said that the services always start with a full breakfast. Jenny and Terry Alford and Nanette Warren provide the music for the services. He reported that the mission makes monthly donations to World Hunger. They also make donations to special mission projects. He reported that the mission gave one thousand dollars worth of materials to go to South Africa and one thousand dollars for the Associational Toy Ministry. Several people from the mission also

volunteered at the Toy Ministry.

Gilford Bufkin, Chairman of the Credentials Committee, reported that the Association received a letter from the Saint's Delight Baptist Church, Louisburg, North Carolina, investigating possible affiliation with the Tar River Baptist Association. He said that Director of Missions Bill Wallace met with the church September 22, 1999, to fully explain the Association's purpose and to cover the requirements for membership. Mr. Bufkin said that the Saint's Delight Baptist Church subsequently wrote another letter, enclosing their Constitution and Articles of Faith, and requested a meeting with the Credentials Committee. The letter stated that the Saint's Delight Congregation voted to affiliate with the Tar River Baptist Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. Mr. Bufkin reported that the Credentials Committee met with Mr. Willie Bartholomew, Chairman of Deacons for the Saint's Delight Baptist Church, on

November 19. Mr. Bartholomew told the committee that because of sickness other leaders could not attend, but he was present with their knowledge and approval. Bufkin reported that the Credentials Committee examined and studied the Constitution and Articles of Faith, and found no inconsistencies in such documents. He made a recommendation from the Credentials Committee that the Saint's Delight Baptist Church be received under the watchcare of the Tar River Baptist Association for one year. At the end of that year, if the Association and the Church are both happy with the relationship, the Saint's Delight Baptist Church may be received into full fellowship with the Association by a majority vote.

Rev. Wallace added to the report of the Credentials Committee that the Saint's Delight Baptist Church at one time had been a Free Will Baptist Church and then an Independent Baptist Church. The church wanted to be part of a group and had heard about the missions work being done by the association. Attendance at the church is down, but they are without a pastor at this time. Rev. Wallace said that at their recent homecoming service the church unanimously approved a motion to join the Tar River Baptist Association. The church is located near the Edward Best School on

Firetower Road.

Gary McNair asked for an explanation of watchcare. Watchcare means the church will participate in the life of the association as if a full member and will have

the same rights as any church.

Rev. Wallace added that Saint's Delight is a self-supporting church and they understand that as members of the association they are required to attend meetings, make contributions to the Association, and file an Annual Church Profile. He said the church's doctrine statement is in compliance. He added that two other churches have been started by Saint's Delight Baptist Church.

A motion was made to accept the recommendation from the Credentials Committee.

The motion carried.

Richard Morgan asked that if anyone knew of a Hispanic Pastor who would be willing to serve at the Franklinton Hispanic Mission to please share the information with the Franklinton Baptist Church.

Rev. Wallace said that the Finance Committee recommends that \$300 travel

allowance for the secretary be added to the budget for the year 2000.

Rev. McNair made a motion to accept the recommendation from the Finance

Committee. Stephen Moore seconded the motion. After discussion, the vote carried. Rev. Wallace, in his Director of Missions Report, said that on October 2, 1999 ministry was conducted at the Spring Hope Pumpkin Festival. Volunteers from several churches assisted with this ministry, giving out about 140 "Jesus" videos and many gallons of water. Information was shared with festival attenders concerning the ministries of the Tar River Baptist Association.

He reported that things went well on the South Africa Mission Trip. Rev. Mike Blevins ministered effectively at the Vredenburg Baptist Fellowship. Rev. Wallace reported that his ministry at the Melkbos Baptist Fellowship was very successful. He and Mike both were involved in teaching, preaching, sharing in homes and schools

during their two-weeks stay. They were well received.

Rev. Wallace announced that volunteers are needed for the Toy Ministry. He explained that all shopping aides and Christian counselors must be adults. Junior and Senior High youth may assist with wrapping gifts on the nights the children He reported that fifteen individuals prayed to receive Christ last year.

Rev. Wallace reported that work continues on the mobile homes to be given to people down east who have lost everything and have no insurance or other means of replacing their living quarters. It is hopeful that delivery can be made before Christmas. He said that one mobile home was sent to the North Roanoke Baptist Association since they were unable to find one available in their area. They will repair it, furnish it, and get it ready for delivery. He added that he is grateful to all those who have had a part in this worthy project.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Tom Eldridge.

January 17, 2000 (Special Called Meeting)

Moderator for the session was Tom Eldridge. Sixty people representing twentytwo churches were present. Epp Catlett was appointed Parliamentarian. Rev. Eldridge read from the Bylaws concerning eligible voters at Board

meetings.

DOM Search Committee Co-chair Dr. C. Ray Pruette reported that the DOM Search Committee had asked Director of Missions Bill Wallace if he would be willing to move his retirement date from February 29, 2000, to June 30, 2000. Dr. Pruette said that Rev. Wallace discussed postponing his retirement with his family and agreed to do so pending the decision of the Associational Board.

Dr. Pruette, upon the recommendation of the DOM Search Committee, made a motion that Director of Missions Bill Wallace move his retirement from February 29, 2000,

to June 30, 2000. After much discussion, the motion failed.

The meeting was adjourned.

March 27, 2000

Moderator for the session was Tom Eldridge. Thirty-seven people representing

seventeen churches were present. Epp Catlett was appointed Parliamentarian.

Baptist Men's Director Wayne Gupton announced the following: Region IV Baptist Men's Rally April 6, a Hands-on Agriculture Workshop in Buies Creek April 7-8, and Disaster Relief Training at Caraway April 28-29. He expressed appreciation to Stephen Moore for accepting the position of Associational RA Director. He also announced that a lady in the Tar River Baptist Association donated a farm to the NC Baptist Men. This farm will be used for a retreat site and other things.

Dr. C. Ray Pruette, Co-chair of the Director of Missions Search Committee, reported that the committee has been busy since the January Board Meeting. The other committee members are Terry Alford, Epp Catlett, Mary Conn, Annette Coppedge, Elaine Lewis, Eldon Reich, and Jimmie Weathers. The first order of business was to find an Interim Director of Missions. The committee called Dr. George Shore, retired from the NC Baptist State Convention, for the position. A letter and Dr. Shore's resume were sent to the board members informing them that Dr. Shore would begin work on March 1.

Dr. Pruette made a motion from the committee that Dr. George Shore be officially employed as interim to work two days a week with the understanding that he will be available to work more often when necessary. He will receive \$100 a day plus travel expenses. The vote carried.

Dr. Pruette reported that the committee is collecting resumes and doing

research to determine a profile for the next Director of Missions.

Tom Eldridge, reporting for Evangelism Director Duane Caldwell, announced that the update for the mapping for evangelism has been ordered.

Treasurer Annette Coppedge presented the February Financial Report.

Laity Leadership Team Member Heather Nelms welcomed Paul Tolbert, Pastor, Peachtree Baptist Church, to the Laity Leadership Team. She announced that about 200 people attended the deacon dinner. She also announced the Real Life Survival Course for high school students to be held at Pearce Baptist Church April 15.

RA Director Stephen Moore announced that six churches participated in the associational basketball league. The league and tournament champion was Louisburg Baptist Church. The Best Christian Attitude Award was given to Oak Grove Baptist Church. Rev. Moore suggested that the churches consider entering a team in the next league and that they include the \$300 registration fee in their church budget. He announced that five churches participated in the Associational Car Derby hosted by Pilot Baptist Church at the Pilot Firehouse. The first place winners were: Lad Adam Bunn and Crusader Joshua Moore. A mission fair was part of the car derby. First place winners in the mission fair were: Lad Matt Cook and Crusader Jason Alford. Best Car Design was awarded to Adam Bunn. Rev. Moore said that next year we plan to include the GAs in the Car Derby. Rev. Moore encouraged involvement in the Associational Track Meet to be held at Bunn High School April 8.

Georgette Burnette, reporting for Vacation Bible School Director Jenny Alford, announced the April 11 VBS Early Bird Clinic for Pastors and VBS Directors. She also announced the clinic for all VBS workers to be held May 4 at Ephesus Baptist

Church.

Georgette Burnette, reporting for WMU Director Kathy Robles, announced the April 4 WMU Spring Meeting at Philadelphia Baptist Church. The program will include a drama presentation by Patricia "Judessa" Frazier and special music by Jill Wester. She also announced a work day scheduled at Mundo Vista in Asheboro on April 15. Participants will help with repair work and clean up.

Tom Eldridge, reporting for Music Director Nanette Warren, announced the Choral

Clinic scheduled for May 23.

Tom Eldridge, reporting for Elvis Pereira, Victoria en Cristo, said that average attendance is eighty-five in Sunday School and ninety-five in worship. Recently six baptisms have been held and six decisions for Christ have been made. Rev. Eldridge also reported that attendance for a study of the Old Testament was seventeen adults and twenty-seven youth. The mission will soon be starting a study of the New Testament. He reported that three men at Victoria en Cristo are being trained to be deacons and one member is being ordained as Music Minister.

Church and Community Ministries Director Gail Nelms reported that during the 1999 Toy Ministry fourteen professions of faith were made, 158 volunteers helped, and 206 families which included 595 children were served. After closing the store an additional 100 families with 333 children were helped. This year for the first time volunteers prepared lunch for the workers. She also reported that Conversational Spanish classes, which began February 3, are conducted Thursday mornings and evenings. The total enrollment for the classes is twenty-two people representing twelve churches. She announced that a survey is being conducted to

assess the need for a deaf ministry in the association. She asked that volunteers who are interested in transporting cancer patients to Rex Cancer Center in Raleigh call the Associational Center.

Rev. Boyd suggested that money for the toy ministry be collected throughout the

year instead of all in December.

Dr. George Shore, in his Interim DOM Report, expressed appreciation to the DOM Search Committee. He complimented the Association on the mission work being done. He announced that the Associational Key Leaders will be attending state training at Caswell in May to prepare them to lead the Associational Key Leadership Conference scheduled for August 21. Dr. Tom Jenkins, NC Baptist State Convention, will be the key speaker for the Associational Key Leadership Conference. He also encouraged involvement with the Alaskan partnership that began January 1, 2000. A copy of the list of ministry opportunities is available at the Associational Center. He said that everyone can be involved in the partnership through prayer. Forms are available in the office to sign up for the Alaskan Prayer Ministry. He reported that volunteers are needed this summer to do construction, sheetrock work, and other repairs in Eastern North Carolina. He also said that the story about Madelyn O'Hare trying to stop religious broadcasting is not true. This story is 25 years old. He concluded his report by encouraging attendance at the Ministers Conference on April 10 to be held at Pearce Baptist Church. At the Ministers Conference Dr. Fred McGehee will speak on "Ministry After Sudden Loss."

Tom Eldridge presented the Spring Meeting agenda. He expressed appreciation to

the churches that are hosting this Associational Meeting.

Willie Bartholomew expressed appreciation to the association for accepting Saint's Delight Baptist Church into the Tar River Baptist Association. He reported that the church called Keith Sigmon as pastor and now has three Sunday School

Gary McNair announced that a volunteer with masonry skills is needed to go on a

mission trip to Honduras with the Flat Rock team.

The Report of the Church and Community Ministries Director

Tar River Baptist Association continues to be involved in gospel sharing ministries. Last fall we sponsored a "Diaper Changing Station and Cold Water Booth" at the Tar River Festival in Louisburg and the Pumpkin Festival in Spring Hope. Volunteers from several churches offered cold water in scripture-imprinted cups and shared information about our association. Two hundred and forty "Jesus" videos were distributed.

In December the 1999 Toy Ministry provided the opportunity to meet the needs of 206 families with 595 children. After closing the store at the Associational Center, we assisted an additional 100 families with 333 children. The gospel was shared with every adult; adults and children received Bibles. Our hearts rejoiced with the 14 people who made decisions to accept Christ as Savior. For the first time we were blessed to have people prepare lunch for our toy ministry volunteers. We are appreciative of our 158 volunteers who are indispensable to our ministry.

Our first Conversational Spanish classes met each Thursday morning and evening from February 3 through April 6. Our total enrollment of 22 represented 12 Tar River Baptist Association churches. Four of our participants are TRBA pastors.

study of Spanish culture was incorporated into the language classes.

We are in the process of generating a list of volunteers involved in our associational ministries. This list will provide a pool of people available for

future ministries.

DOM Bill Wallace organized and led our association's response to the victims of the devastation wrought by Hurricane Floyd. In addition to clean-up and repair crews from various churches, the association completely renovated and installed new furnishings in five mobile homes that were given to victims of the flood. These families lost everything and had no way to replace their losses. Thanks to the generosity of Mr. William Jones, owner of Joyful Homes in Louisburg, the association was able to secure six mobile homes. One of these was shared with a sister association that was unable to secure one in their area.

Gratitude must be expressed to the Louisburg, Philadelphia, Pilot, and Spring Hope Baptist Churches for agreeing to take one of the mobile units and supervise the renovation of that unit. Other area churches assisting those already mentioned include Castalia, Poplar Spring, Pine Ridge, Pearce, and Ephesus. Volunteers from the Bunn, Holly Grove, and Pilot Baptist Churches, and from Lake Royale Christian Ministries renovated a fifth unit. A number of churches, individuals, and merchants

provided furnishings for these homes.

Each unit was equipped with new beds, bedding, and linens. Window curtains and blinds were installed. New ranges, refrigerators, washers and dryers were placed in each unit, along with pots, pans, dishes, and flat wear. Each unit was equipped with either new or good used furniture. A Bible was placed in each mobile home before delivery. Everything was in place for a family just to move in and start living.

The mobile homes from the Tar River Baptist Association went to the following locations: Beaufort, Burgaw, Chinquapin, Seven Springs, and Vanceboro. The proud new owners of these units are appreciative of all you did to make this possible. We

also thank DOM Bill Wallace who devoted numerous hours to this ministry.

Join us as we continue to seek new ministries and new ways to share the gospel. Jesus came "not to be served but to serve." If we are to express the life of Christ, we must be doing the same things He was doing. Every time we help someone through the ministries we encourage, our primary concern is to share the gospel. Jesus went where the people were. He went out seeking the lost and hurting. We must do the same.

Proceedings For Fall Session October 30, 2000 Held at Samaria Baptist Church Assisted by Bailey and Pilot Baptist Churches

Afternoon Session

The 170th fall session of the Tar River Baptist Association was called to order at 3:30 p.m. by Moderator Tom Eldridge, Bunn Baptist Church.

2. Mr. Jerry Kennett, Samaria Baptist Church, led in singing the hymn "I Love To

Tell The Story."

3. Rev. Butch Gordon, Samaria Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer. Rev. Eldridge organized the session and appointed Mr. Epp Catlett, Flat Rock Baptist Church, as parliamentarian.

5. Mr. Catlett presented the program with a few changes and made a motion that it

be adopted. The vote carried.

6. Rev. Eldridge recognized and welcomed new staff as follows: Rev. Mark Somers, Pastor, Bunn Baptist Church; Rev. Daryl Jones, Minister of Youth, Bunn Baptist Church; Rev. Keith Sigmon, Pastor, Saint's Delight Baptist Church; Rev. Paul Sapp, Pastor, Pine Ridge Baptist Church; and Rev. Elvis Pereira, Pastor, Victoria en Cristo Hispanic Mission. Rev. Eldridge also recognized and welcomed the following quests: Mr. Tom Denton, Baptist Foundation and Mr. Tom Hall, Director of Alumni Services, Chowan College.

7. Mrs. Georgette Burnette, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, recognized the sixteen

honor clerks.

8. The histories of the host churches were presented by Ms. Bertie Mae Cone, Samaria; Mr. James Williams, Bailey; Mr. Jesse Murphrey, Pilot; and Mrs. Doris Carlyle, Social Plains.

Special music was provided by Minister of Music Jerry Kennett, Samaria Baptist

Church.

10. Interim Director of Missions George Shore explained that the Baptist State Convention adopted a three-year partnership with Alaska. He said that money is in the Tar River budget to help people go on a mission trip to Alaska. Opportunities in Alaska include VBS work, leading retreats, participating in simultaneous revivals, leading training seminars, leading evangelism workshops, doing construction work, serving as interim pastor, and more. Dr. Shore said that one church in Alaska needs eighty-five new Baptist hymnals. Other needs in Alaska include recreation equipment such as ice skates, skis, and sports equipment. 11. Mr. Jesse Murphrey reported on work down east. He said that in September 1999 eastern North Carolina was flooded. The Red Cross and National Guard units were activated to evacuate people and to search for those who were missing. Many volunteers helped. Mr. Murphrey said that flood waters exceeded record highs and caused vast destruction. He added that shelters were set up. North Carolina Baptists operated feeding units in different areas and were assisted by other states. He added that North Carolina Baptists have repaired and finished over 800 homes. He said that Tar River churches renovated and finished five mobile homes that were sent down east. Over 15,000 volunteers have assisted Baptist efforts. Other denominations have helped, too. Many churches have partnered with churches or families from down east. He indicated that it has been over a year since the flood, but the aftermath is not over. Volunteers are still needed. He said that anyone who will help, even if for one Saturday, should call the Convention. He concluded

by saying that volunteers can go, pray, or give. 12. Rev. Gary McNair, Flat Rock Baptist Church, presented a report on missions in Honduras. He said that he worked in eastern North Carolina and in Honduras. One difference he cited is that many homes in eastern North Carolina were flooded but were still standing. In Honduras houses were washed away and not left standing. He said that a two-year partnership was established with Honduras due to Hurricane Mitch. He said that he went to Honduras with a group of people on two different occasions. He said the Honduras people are very appreciative of the help. He added that teams went to build houses. For each house constructed a dedication service was held. Each home was given a Bible with the hope of starting a Bible study and

eventually a church. He encouraged volunteers to go to Honduras and experience what God is doing there.

13. Mr. Kennett led in singing the hymn "Let Others See Jesus In You." 14. Associational Historian Jeanette Ayscue, Mountain Grove Baptist Church, presented the historian's report. She said that since last October churches reported mission trips, new pastors and staff, new ministries, youth activities, new buildings, and renovations.

- 15. Mr. Gerald Nelms, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, presented the report from the Nominating Committee. He presented a motion from the Nominating Committee that the report be adopted. The vote carried. 16. Dr. Shore led in the installation of the officers and leaders.
- Mrs. Annette Coppedge, Ephesus Baptist Church, presented the September Financial Report and the Proposed 2001 Budget. She presented a motion from the Finance Committee that the proposed budget be adopted. The vote carried. 18. Dr. C. Ray Pruette, Franklinton Baptist Church, presented a report from the Director of Missions Search Committee. He announced that the committee has finished its work. He said that their work was not easy as they accepted the responsibility of finding God's man for the association. He said the committee believes they have

found this man. He added that the committee asked Dr. Shore to work four more days. He concluded by saying that Tar River Baptist Association has a new Director of Missions. He is Rev. Dougald McLaurin, pastor at Nashville Baptist Church. He reported that at the Associational Board meeting in September a motion was made to extend a call to Rev. McLaurin as the new Director of Missions. The vote carried. Rev. McLaurin will begin his duties on November 1, 2000, with a compensation package

of \$50,000.

19. Rev. Dougald McLaurin expressed appreciation to the DOM Search Committee. He said that he believes God has called him to serve Tar River as Director of Missions. He said that he looks forward to working in the association for many years to come. He said that when you look at the associational statistics you see that Tar River is 10,000 strong in membership. Many people, sold out to Christ, can accomplish many things. This area is growing and the mission field is coming to Tar River. Thousands around us are lost. He said that he will strive to assist the churches of Tar River in fulfilling its mission. He said we need to commit to work together to reach the lost. He warned that the enemy works to distract us from our purpose and to keep our focus off of God's work. But, he added, the enemy has limited power. We serve one who is all powerful. Together with Christ we can do His work. He said that we have a tremendous responsibility and a remarkable privilege to bring lost people to Christ. He promised that he would strive daily to present himself a living sacrifice to Christ, to work with the people of the association, to pray for the people, and to do his best because God deserves the best. He asked for the association to pray for him. He concluded by expressing appreciation for the privilege of serving as the Director of Missions.

20. Dr. Pruette said that seven months

Dr. Pruette said that seven months ago (March 2000) Dr. George Shore began as interim Director of Missions. He said that Dr. Shore blessed us with his presence, his expertise, and his wisdom. He presented Dr. Shore with a plaque as evidence of

our affection. Dr. Shore received a standing ovation.

The association applauded the DOM Search Committee. Mr. Kennett led in singing the hymn "Ye Servants Of God." 22.

Church and Community Ministries Director Gail Nelms, Sandy Creek Baptist Church, expressed appreciation to the volunteers and encouraged continued support of the association's mission opportunities. She announced that the 2000 toy ministry is approaching and that funds are needed to buy Bibles and toys. Volunteers are needed to carry out the toy ministry. She asked pastors to send in the names of families who needed help. She said that forms to volunteer and to refer people are available, along with a gift for each person. Mrs. Nelms shared testimony of growing up on a farm with people laboring together. She explained that her father labored in love. She shared a story about a gifted artist who reworked clay done by his father. Mrs. Nelms explained that what we do is not perfect, but God can put his hands on and transform it. She encouraged people to labor in love, trusting God to make it perfect.

24. During the time for miscellaneous business, Mrs. Mary Conn, White Level Baptist Church, made a motion that the 2000 annual be dedicated to former Director of Missions Bill Wallace in appreciation for his thirteen years of service and dedication to our association. The motion was seconded by Rev. Gary McNair, Flat

Rock Baptist Church, and the vote carried.

25. Rev. Ed Carroll, Harris Chapel Baptist Church, introduced Dr. Wayne Wike, executive director, Council on Christian Higher Education. Dr. Wike said one purpose of the Council on Christian Higher Education is to provide young men and women an education to prepare them to serve God. He shared information on the work of the Council. He reported that Divinity Schools were started at Campbell University and Gardner Webb. He added that theological grants are available to help young people attend divinity school. He asked for prayer for the institutions and that young people be encouraged to explore the possibility of attending a Baptist institution. He concluded by saying that speakers are available for Baptist College Day on February 18, 2001.

26. Rev. Shelby Stephens, Pilot Baptist Church, led in thanksgiving for the evening

Evening Session

The evening session began with pre-service music.

Moderator Tom Eldridge called the session to order.

Mr. Jerry Kennett led in singing the hymn "Set My Soul Afire."

Interim William Wakefield, Social Plains Baptist Church, read scripture and led in prayer.

5. Baptist Men's Council Director Wayne Gupton, Red Bud Baptist Church, announced that a fund for a recovery trailer was started at the Baptist Men's Rally. He said

that donations are needed to buy and to equip the trailer.

6. Evangelism Council Director Duane Caldwell, Bailey Baptist Church, thanked Dr. Shore for his support and encouragement. Rev. Caldwell reported that a servanthood evangelism workshop was held in which participants went out in the community to share the gospel in different ways. He shared that in the Tar River Baptist Association baptisms were down. In the current report twelve churches reported no baptisms, but Beulah Christian Baptist Church reported thirty-eight baptisms. Rev. Caldwell said that it is great to go on mission trips, but there are also many lost people in our community. We need to equip our people to share their faith. He encouraged support for the next Evangelism Council Director Mike Blevins, Corinth Baptist Church. He said that the Evangelism Council is available to assist the churches. He concluded with the challenge to let God set your soul afire and to share the good news of Christ.

7. Media Library Council Director Tommie Lankford, Louisburg Baptist Church, said that last year we were just beginning to start supplying the library at the Associational Center. We have added many new resources, including nineteen new books last week. She said the association does not have a huge media center, but we have quality materials. She encouraged use of the associational media library. said that Rev. Bill Wallace started the media center with many good resources; Dr. George Shore was very supportive of the media library; Rev. Dougald McLaurin donated ten study courses; Mrs. Wendy Edwards provided a book list; and the WMU made several

donations.

Music Council Director Nanette Warren, Pilot Baptist Church, announced that Pilot Baptist Church had recently celebrated her twenty-five years of service at the church. She said that many musical opportunities are available and she wanted to know of any talents or interests in the association. She said that children love

music and she encouraged buying Christian music as gifts.

9. RA Director Stephen Moore, White Level Baptist Church, shared the RA pledge. He explained that the RA program is to help the churches help the boys to achieve the pledge. He said that several activities are planned including the car derby and missions fair, the basketball league, and a track meet. He concluded by announcing that other activities are being considered such as a camporee and a mission rally. 10. Rev. Earl Roach, Hopkins Chapel Baptist Church, presented the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee report as printed. He said that assisting churches and an alternate preacher are needed. Volunteers should call the associational center. History of Samaria Baptist Church

Samaria Baptist Church is located in the small rural community of Samaria, Nash County, NC. The church was organized in 1823. The first two buildings were white frame churches. In 1940 the present brick building was built under the leadership of Rev. A. D. Parrish.

Samaria has supported missions since its beginning; this is the reason it left the Primitive Baptist Church. The early members believed in preaching and teaching God's Word and giving to missions. Records of the 1800s show gifts to community,

associational, state, home, and foreign missions.

The early revivals were held during the day time, usually in July/August, with services lasting all day. As landowners brought their servants and "colored" workers to the revivals, many of them accepted Christ and became members of the church.

Church life was to be taken seriously. Members were excommunicated for card playing, profanity, dancing, drunkenness, adultery, fornication, failing to pay dues, falsehood, non-attendance, broken fellowship, and making/selling intoxicating drink. Members were disciplined when they failed to meet Christian standards for conduct. Erring members were contacted and efforts were made to restore them to proper conduct, to forgive them and to allow full fellowship.

Prayer was an integral part of the Christian responsibility. The church held

days of fasting, prayer, and thanksgiving during the year. The pastor's salary was collected from the membership by a chosen committee. Each family was expected to

contribute.

In March 1866, the church voted to allow its building to be used for a public

school "on condition they take good care of it."

Samaria Church has belonged to the Roanoke and Raleigh Associations, and presently is a member of the Tar River Association. It hosted the associational

meetings as early as October 4, 1887.

Leadership positions were held by men until late 1930s when women began to teach Sunday School. Strong spirit-filled revivals brought increased membership. On August 23, 1881, the church received "by experience" twenty-five males and thirty-three females. Until the 1900s, the church membership roll was separated by male, female, and colored. It was important for male members to be present, especially during church conferences. The roll was called for males at each meeting and at intervals for females. In 1881 membership was 163. In 1930 Sunday School enrollment was 123. The first Vacation Bible School was held in 1951 with 161 enrolled. The second VBS, in 1952, had 198 in attendance. Sunday School enrollment was 193.

Our church has been honored to see these new churches begun from its membership: Rocky Cross, Union Hope, Social Plains, Stanhope, and a church at Gold Valley. Several members have been called as ministers of the gospel.

In 1951 a parsonage was built and the church called its first full time pastor,

Rev. Colon S. Jackson, Jr. (wife Doris).

Renovations added classrooms, a library, and a pastor's study. Memorials included new choir robes, hymnals, handbells, chimes, a church steeple, musical instruments, and a handicap ramp.

In November 1994 a Christian Life Center was built at a cost of \$141,000. A

dedication service was held in 1995.

In 1996 Samaria hosted the semi-annual meeting of the Tar River Baptist Association. Hurricane Fran damaged the church steeple and bell tower. Repairs cost \$14,825.

On March 29,1998, the Mass-Rowe Musical Handbells and a Baldwin Digital piano were dedicated. In October 1998 our one hundred seventy-fifth

homecoming/anniversary was held with 350 attending.

In 1999 the parsonage was remodeled at a cost of \$31,999. The nursery was

relocated and updated with new furnishings.

In 2000 we called our present pastor, Butch Gordon, and our present Minister of Music, Jerry Kennett. Church improvement renovations included new carpet, cushioned pews, enlarged choir space, painting, landscaping, and a new church sign.

The ministry of Samaria continues with support to associational, state, home, and foreign missions. A homebound ministry includes sharing audio tapes of our

worship services with members and health care facilities.

As we reflect on the witness and growth of 177 years, we humbly thank God for His blessings, mercy, and grace. We dedicate ourselves anew to the work and witness of this church and our faith, to the needs of our community, and to the world. Our prayer is to become "His will" as we work in "His fields, laboring for lost souls in 'His Holy name.'"

History of Bailey Baptist Church

On September 26, 1909, the Missionary Baptist Church of Bailey was constituted with James P. Underwood, Sr., Robert L. Underwood, L. R. Finch, B. L. Taylor and daughter, Mrs. Ellen Finch, and Miss Mary Underwood as charter members. Rev. J. W. Nobles, State Missionary, served as the first pastor. In October, 1909, the church was accepted into the Johnston Baptist Association and remained a member until 1961 when it changed to the Tar River Association. The new church soon erected a one room frame building on Hwy 581. In 1913, a Sunday School was organized with James P. Underwood as the first superintendent with 63 enrolled. In 1914, a Woman's Missionary Society was organized with Mrs. C. H. (Edna) Brantley as the first president. In 1921, the Sunbeams numbered 15, and by 1939, Girls Auxiliary and Royal Ambassadors had been organized. By 1946, membership had reached 73, and the need for expansion was realized. The lot where our present church building stands was purchased, and in 1947 an educational building was constructed. Construction on the main auditorium began in 1950 and was completed in 1956. Plans for the pastorium were begun in 1957, and the building was completed in 1959. (J. Monte Bishop was the first pastor to live there.)

In 1952, Training Union was organized with 41 members with Elizabeth Burgess as the director. Enrollment increased to 91 by 1962, but by 1974 the program was discontinued. In May 1954, the first GA Coronation and RA Recognition Service presented 12 girls and 9 boys. Ten more GA Recognition Services followed in the next 14 years. In 1955, the WMS gave \$75 to purchase supplies to begin a church library. Members of the church have contributed books and money and the church budget also assists in procuring some books and videos. In 1977, renovation on the Educational Building was started; the interior was completely remodeled. In 1981, Sunday School enrollment and attendance increased. A Backyard Bible School, in addition to VBS, was held. In 1983, Junior and Youth choirs were organized, an RA group was organized, a copy machine was purchased, and a monthly newsletter was begun. In 1985, two GAs were recognized for advancing in Mission Adventures, and in 1986 Pioneer and Crusader RAs were re-organized. In 1988, a mission at Sims was sponsored, Acteen and GA Advancement Recognition Services were held, and three members participated in Togo mission work. In 1990, T. R. (Pete) Stone was ordained into the ministry. Sims Mission was constituted as Sims Baptist Church. Members participated in Bunn Prison Ministry in June and have made this an annual commitment. In 1991, two new Sunday School classes were started, a Baby Dedication Service was held, and a choir director was hired. In 1992, senior adults attended a three-day meeting at Caswell Baptist Assembly in May and have continued this each year. The sanctuary was remodeled. The church became sponsor/coordinator of the

Strickland's Crossroads Hispanic Mission, renamed later to Victory in Christ Hispanic Mission.

In 1996, our current pastor, Duane Caldwell, was called to Bailey Baptist. The church sponsored sending him on an associational mission trip to South Africa in 1997. Also in 1997, we began an outreach Sunday School class and worship service at Spring Arbor, a local retirement home. In 1999, we began FAITH Evangelism through the Sunday School and hired a youth minister, Geoff Prows. In 2000, we began a new fellowship/educational building in order to handle the growth we are experiencing.

In addition to working with the association, state, and national convention, we also work with our community. We work with all the churches in our community to meet the needs around us. We helped begin the Bailey Area Ministries. This ministry receives resources from all the community churches to meet the financial and spiritual needs of those around us. We work together. We also worship together as four Bailey churches meet every fifth Sunday evening for worship; the men of eleven different churches meet once a month for a Community Men's Prayer Breakfast.

Since its beginning, the church has had 33 pastors. We have seen steady growth in membership, as well as periods of decline. However, the church has not failed to support missions and to quote Carrie Meacomes, who at the time was the oldest living member of our church, "I feel the mission program is the heart of our church work . . . I believe the more mission minded we are, the more God will bless us as a church." As we are mission minded, we have discovered that missions is more than across the ocean or across the United States. Missions is in our own back yard. As a result of this awareness, we had the largest single year growth in the history of our church in the church year 1999 - 2000 as people are being won to Jesus Christ. We are a church that reaches out with faith, hope, and love. And the greatest of these is love.

History of Pilot Baptist Church

In May 1888, L. H. Joyner and about twenty-five others met in a brush arbor across the road from the Lemmie Massey Home to organize a Sunday School.

It was not until 1903 that the church was organized as Joyner's Chapel Church. It became Pilot Baptist Church in 1924. Rev. George Duke was called as the first pastor. The church was admitted into the Tar River Baptist Association as Joyner's Chapel Church in 1904.

The present church building was finished in 1950. The lumber for the building

came from some of the membership of the church.

Early in 1953, the elementary school property (the present annex) was purchased along with twelve acres of land. The grounds of this property are used mostly for recreation: a picnic shelter, basketball and tennis court, baseball field, and housing of church bus and van. Pilot Baptist Church Daycare Ministry was begun August 29, 1983, and the building is used for both daycare and Sunday School.

Mr. Bob Murdock served as the first Minister of Music, Education, and Youth in 1969. Nanette Warren began her work as Minister of Music and Education July 27, The church honored her for twenty-five years of service on August 27, 2000.

The church has employed a part-time secretary since 1964. The first secretary was Treasure Lewis, followed by Winnie C. Phillips, Jill Owen, Kim Alford, Teresa Alford, and Mary Wood.

Serving the church as our first Associate Pastor was Tim McQueen in 1983. Thereafter, the following served: Ron Galyon 1985-87; Roger Hensley 1987-88; Eric Hayes 1989-90; Brian Huffstetler 1990-92; John Walker 1993-96; Kevin Parker 1996-2000; and Michael Stoval present.

The men who have been ordained into Christian ministry are: Barry Jones,

Anthony K. Ray, Ron Galyon, Roger Hensley, and Kevin Parker.

Pilot Baptist Church has had twenty pastors/interim pastors: George Duke 1903-1911; W. L. Bilbro 1911-13; W. H. Hartsell 1913-19; J. W. Noble 1919-19; J. F. Mitchiner 1920-21; A. A. Pippin 1921-33; Ford Burns 1933-38; Richard Collins 1938-40; Ralph Cannon 1940-43; M. A. Pegram 1944-54; Gilbert McDowell 1954-64; Luther Copeland (Interim) 1964-64; Patrick Forbes 1964-66; James Tull (Interim) 1966-67; Donald Wagner 1967-78; Garland Hendricks (Interim) 1978-79; Jesse Mooney, Jr. 1979-1988; Roger Hensley 1988-92; Robert Watson (Interim) 1992-93; Shelby L. Stephens Feb. 1993-2001.

Pilot Baptist Church has always been mission minded. We have had members to travel on mission trips to Belize, Barbados, South Africa, Togo, Florida, New York,

and local missions through our associational work.

Pilot Baptist Church has been a recipient of several memorial gifts, among them: Clyde & Corinne Pearce Memorial (Baptist Foundation), Bill & Hazel Mullen Memorial Gift, Odell Jeans C. Richards Memorial Gift, individual monetary gifts placed in church memorial fund, and Ronnie Denton Educational Fund.

Our memorial gifts have enabled us to provide new choir robes, church chimes, a church steeple, lighting for the church building, and a new sound system.

Two important vehicles for our use have been the purchase of a 1998 Ford bus with a seating capacity of twenty-five people and a 1999 Chevrolet van with a seating capacity of fifteen people.

Our church history is one of continuous success as we serve our Lord through

worship, ministry, and missions.

History of Social Plains Baptist Church

Social Plains Baptist Church was organized in 1883 with twelve charter members: Keuser, Calvin, Sidney, Bryant, John, Martha, Jane E., Mary A., Lucy Alford, Phinuhus and Nancy Puckett, and S. B. Bunn.

The Hagwood family gave the land for the church building. Church services were held on Saturday until 1921 when the membership had grown to thirty-four and a yearly budget to \$65. In 1935 the membership was sixty, and the pastor's salary was

\$30.29. The first missions offering was given that year.

In 1936 the church lost a number of members to the newly organized Union Hope Baptist Church. The next three years it looked as if the church would be disbanded, but the leadership of Pastor Julius Holloway helped the church stage a comeback in 1939. In 1940 the pastor's salary was increased to \$75 a year and missions giving was increased. In 1950 a building fund was started with a \$500 budget. Under the leadership of Mrs. Elizabeth Jones, a WMU was organized on May 10, 1953, with twelve

In 1955 work was begun on the new church building. Materials and labor were donated by members and friends of the church. The sanctuary was completed in 1956 at a cost of \$6,050. The first service in the new building was held April 8, 1956. The foundation for the educational building was remodeled and turned into a community building in 1964. A fiberglass baptistry was installed in 1966.

The first GA Coronation Service was held in March 1967. Choir robes and an organ were also purchased that year. The pastorium was begun in September 1969 and completed in November 1972 at a cost of \$15,697. The church building was air conditioned in 1971. In 1974 an addition was built on the community building. new classrooms were added to the church in 1981. In October 1982, the church licensed its first candidate for the ministry, Charles Smith. On October 9, 1983, the church celebrated its one hundredth anniversary.

Social Plains has participated in mission trips to West Virginia, Togo, Brazil,

and Romania.

The present membership is 187. The budget for 2000 is \$53,708 with eleven percent of regular income going to the Cooperative Program and five percent to Associational Missions. Total value of church property is \$473,000.

Baptist Men's Council Report

The Baptist Men's Council wants to thank Dr. George Shore for the help he has given us during this transition period. The council is excited about the way things are going.

We had a good session at the Key Leadership Conference with Richard Brunson,

Executive Director of North Carolina Baptist Men, leading us.

We had a good Baptist Men's and Boys' Rally with Carl Nance, Disaster Relief Coordinator at Tarboro, and Gaylon Moss, NC Baptist Men, as speakers. Special music was provided by men from Union View Baptist Church. The meal was prepared by David Leonard and his crew from Philadelphia Baptist Church. Lin Honeycutt brought a Disaster Recovery Trailer from his church in Raleigh for our men to see.

At the rally, we started a fund for Tar River's own Disaster Recovery Trailer by taking an offering of approximately \$500. This trailer, when equipped, will be available for any and every church in Tar River Association to use as they do handy

man projects or disaster recovery.

Tar River also had some people certiifed in Disaster Relief this year, and we still have people going down East where there remains a great need.

Mission Report: Hispanic/Victoria en Cristo

The growth of Victoria en Cristo is being accomplished by special studies such as discipleship classes, conferences, Baptist doctrine study, and a campaign of

stewardship. There is a strong emphasis in the preparation of leaders.

We have been busy this year. The youth participated in two weekend retreats at Caswell. My wife and I taught women's conferences at Ridgecrest. Three deacons were ordained. A Minister of Education and a Minister of Music were appointed. Summer evangelism programs were conducted in four migrant camps. These Biblical studies offered thirteen weeks of discipleship. During these thirteen weeks, fortyfive people were saved, with five of them being baptized. The mission has a planned budget which includes ten percent for missions (the Cooperative Program, the association, Lottie Moon, Annie Armstrong, and state missions). There has been an

increase in tithes and offerings. The mission has sixty-nine active members with a Sunday School enrollment of ninety-three. Average attendance at our worship service is ninety-three. Fifteen adults and eleven youth participated in discipleship classes. Throughout this year we have had twenty baptisms and four weddings. On November 12, 2000, we will vote on the church constitution. In the coming year, our goals are to start Bible study in other areas of the Tar River Baptist Association and to promote construction of a new church building for Victoria at Capital and to promote construction of a new church building for Victoria en Cristo.

Last spring we offered our first Survival Spanish class with 22 enrolled. Our second class, which began September 7, 2000, has been expanded to eleven weeks. The 56 participants include pastors and other church staff personnel, laypeople, Franklin County teachers, employees of the town of Louisburg, Franklin County Social Services and Health Department employees, and Tar River Baptist Association staff. We are appreciative of the dedicated work of our instructor, Mrs. Connie Waters.

This fall we again sponsored the "Diaper Changing/Cold Water Booth" at the festivals. One thousand cups of cold water were distributed at the Tar River Festival in Louisburg. The free water is offered in cups imprinted with scripture and the plan of salvation. Eleven volunteers distributed tracts and Tar River Association brochures, provided ice and water, and helped set up and dismantle the tent. Flat Rock Acteens witnessed with 175 salvation bracelets; the Poplar Spring youth and their puppets witnessed through music. At the Pumpkin Festival in Spring Hope, Flat Rock Acteens witnessed to 213 people with salvation bracelets; 1,200 cups of cold water were distributed. We appreciate the twenty volunteers who shared the gospel through this ministry.

Preparations are already underway for the 2000 Toy Ministry. This wonderful ministry allows us to reach over 200 families with the gospel each year. We

Executive Board Report


The Executive Board of the Tar River Baptist Association has met twice since the Semi-Annual Meeting in April 2000. Both meetings were held at the Associational Center.


June 26, 2000

Moderator for the session was Vice Moderator Epp Catlett. Thirty-nine people were present, representing eighteen churches. Gary McNair was appointed as Parliamentarian.

Baptist Men's Director Wayne Gupton reported that the Baptist Men's Council met in April and in June. Mr. Gupton announced that training will be held for Baptist Men and RA leaders at Caraway in August and that an associational rally and supper are being planned for September 19.

Associational Resource Specialist Team Member Mark Cottrell reported that he, Linda Boulden, and Heather Nelms attended state Sunday School training. He said





that in September the Family Bible Study series will begin. In this series the youngest child through the adults will be studying the same scripture so that

families can study together.

DOM Search Committee Co-Chairman Dr. C. Ray Pruette said that the committee continues to solicit prayers, confidence, and support as they search for God's man. He said that Dr. Shore agreed to work part time as Interim Director of Missions, two days a week at \$12.50 an hour plus travel expenses. Dr. Pruette explained that although Dr. Shore was hired part time he has been working full time with many night engagements each week. Dr. Pruette said that the Search Committee suggests that when an invitation is extended for Dr. Shore to speak, the church asking should pay his travel and give him an honorarium. Dr. Pruette continued his report by saying that the Search Committee members are now reading resumes. Dr. Pruette said that the committee needs to know what salary package they can offer the prospective Director of Missions.

DOM Search Committee Co-Chairman Jimmie Weathers said that the committee met with Bobby Stafford, NC Baptist State Convention, who provided an overview of financial support for Directors of Missions across North Carolina. The focus was on associations similar to Tar River. Mr. Weathers said that the DOM Search Committee recommended to the Finance Committee that the DOM package be an amount up to fifty thousand dollars. At the May Finance Committee meeting, the committee members asked Mr. Weathers, who is also the chairman for the Finance Committee, to make the motion to the Board concerning the DOM package. Mr. Weathers presented a motion to the board that an annual amount of up to fifty thousand dollars be approved for a The motion was seconded by Mike Blevins, and the vote Director of Missions package.

carried. Dr. Shore, reporting for Evangelism Council Director Duane Caldwell, said that

a program called "Family to Family" is designed to inspire families to be on mission

together.

Finance Committee Chairman Jimmy Weathers presented the May Financial Report. He then made a motion, upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee, that a CPA be hired to do an annual audit of the associational books (financial records). The motion was seconded by Patrick Lengel.

Gary McNair made a motion to amend the above motion by adding that the CPA have no connections with the association. Mike Blevins seconded the motion, and the vote

on the amendment carried.

The vote on the amended motion carried.

Discipleship Support Director Wendy Edwards said that the Discipleship Team members are making plans for 2001. She announced a training conference for Bible drill leaders and judges to be held August 22, 2000, at Peachtree Baptist Church. She continued her report saying that the team is working on a different strategy. They have divided the association into groups of churches. For each group a pastor will be enlisted to be an informal link for the group. This pastor will report to the Discipleship Team any discipling needs discovered and will help communicate information to the churches in his assigned group.

Music Director Nanette Warren reported that Phil Haden, New Hope Baptist Church, Raleigh, led the Associational Choral Clinic. She said that she teamed with Wendy Edwards to do a video to promote Project Inasmuch. Ms. Warren announced a music conference to be held at Key Leadership in August and two Hymn Sings in

September.

RA Director Stephen Moore reported that a track meet was held April 8 at Bunn High School. Coach Wright and Beta Club members assisted with the meet. He said that at the track meet three churches were represented by nineteen children and youth. The winners were as follows: team champion was White Level, runner-up was Poplar Spring, and third place was Ephesus. He said that each year Tar River offers a youth basketball league, a car derby and missions fair, and a track meet. He encouraged participation in each. He is considering adding a camporee and a missions rally for RAs. He concluded his report by announcing that race car kits are available at the associational center for four dollars each.

WMU Director Kathy Robles recognized former WMU Directors Nan Jones, Doris Carlyle, and Lottie Lou Dickens. She reported that the Associational WMU Leadership Team met on May 21, that she attended Key Leadership Training at Caswell in May, and that the Leadership Team will attend training at Caraway in July. Mrs. Robles announced the State Missions Rally to be held August 27 at Pilot. She reported that Hopkins Chapel sponsored a Spiritual Growth Workshop in May, and fourteen people attended a Mission Friends/Children in Action event in June. She announced that Victoria en Cristo will be selling plates July 8 to raise money for the WMU Project Campaign. She congratulated Social Plains and Pilot for meeting their Project Campaign goals. She reported that Tar River WMU has received \$7,246.65 thus far for Project Campaign. She said nine members at Philadelphia are training for the Volunteer Connection program, and the Tar River Volunteer Connection team plans to

go on mission trips in 2001 to Georgia and Alaska. She concluded her report by

saying that the WMU hopes to start a Fibromyalgia Support Group.

Bill Wallace said that the Lake Royale Mission is a self-supporting mission in the Tar River Baptist Association. He said that he preaches at the mission every Sunday morning at 8:30 a.m. with forty-five to seventy-five people in attendance. He added that services always begin with breakfast. He also said the mission makes regular contributions to missions causes.

Church and Community Ministries Director Gail Nelms encouraged participation in the Associational Toy Ministry. She said that donations of toys or funds are needed. Mrs. Nelms said that she has generated a list of volunteers that she will continue to update. This volunteer list will be a valuable tool for enlisting volunteers for future ministries and will also be useful in planning for the Volunteer Recognition Banquet scheduled in September. She reported that surveys were sent to the churches in April to determine the need for a deaf ministry. A few responses were received but no indications that there is a need for this ministry. She said we know there are silent people in our area and we would like to offer sign language training to reach these people. The Convention will help fund training in sign language. Anyone who can provide information or would like to take sign language should contact Mrs. Nelms. She reported that the applications to the Chambers of Commerce in Louisburg and Spring Hope concerning the Tar River Festival and Pumpkin Festival have been submitted. She said the Cold Water/Diaper Changing Station will operate in these locations at the Tar River Festival in September and the Pumpkin Festival in October. She encouraged volunteers to help with these festivals. She reported that the first Conversational Spanish class was completed in April. The beginning Spanish class will be offered again this fall on Thursdays, from September 7 through November 16. Some revisions have been made in the course

which will offer eleven weeks of instruction rather than eight.

Interim DOM George Shore said that he has enjoyed the last four months in the Tar River Baptist Association. He said he had taken medical tests and all reports were good. He announced a Church Finance Workshop to be held August 17 at Maple Springs Baptist Church. He said that Tar River is divided into six groups, and the coordinator of each group will receive training concerning Operation Inasmuch on June 27. The Operation Inasmuch ministries will be conducted on October 28. Dr. Shore announced Key Leadership to be held August 21 at Louisburg Baptist Church. reported that eleven of the twelve Cooperative Agreement requests for 2001 were approved by the NC Baptist State Convention. He announced that the partnership with the Franklinton Hispanic Mission has been dissolved. A Hispanic group outside the association is now meeting at the Franklinton Baptist Church. He said the Nominating Committee is busy and encouraged volunteers to agree to take positions when the Nominating Committee called. He announced that the Finance Committee will soon be working on the proposed 2001 budget. He suggested that churches become prayer partners with Alaskan churches during the three-year partnership between North Carolina and Alaska. He reported that two evangelism teams are needed in Lesotho October 26-November 8, and volunteers may call the associational center for information. Dr. Shore said that Bill Wallace will be going to Cape Town this fall and four volunteers may go with him. He closed his report by announcing that Richard Brunson will speak at the Volunteer Appreciation Banquet on September 23.

Gary McNair stated that a motion was adopted at the October 1999 fall meeting which said that information concerning a Disaster Relief Unit would be shared at the June Board Meeting. He asked about the information. Wayne Gupton said that the council is still gathering that information. Rev. McNair suggested that the churches be told that money is needed for a unit.

Epp Catlett reported that a new associational map has been developed by Duane

Credentials Committee member Nan Jones said that the committee had met with the pastor and members of the Cornerstone Baptist Church, Spring Hope. She presented a recommendation from the Credentials Committee that the Cornerstone Baptist Church be received under watchcare for one year. Jim Leonard made a motion that the Tar River Baptist Association receive Cornerstone Baptist Church under watchcare for one year. Gary McNair seconded the motion, and the vote carried.

Epp Catlett reminded the Board members that the one-year watchcare term for

Saint's Delight Baptist Church will be completed in November, 2000.

Nan Jones reminded Board members that after the one-year watchcare term the Credentials Committee will meet with the church before the church is presented as full members.

The meeting adjourned with prayer.

September 25, 2000

Moderator for the session was Tom Eldridge. One hundred, twenty-five people were present, representing twenty-seven churches and one mission. Gary McNair was appointed as Parliamentarian.

Baptist Men's Director Wayne Gupton reported that at the Baptist Men's Rally in September a fund for a Recovery Trailer was started. The offering received at the rally for the trailer was \$472 with a \$100 pledge.

Discipleship Team Member Mark Cottrell said that the Discipleship Team divided the association into areas to help promote communication. Each area was appointed a contact person. The team recently met with the contact people. He announced that scholarships for marriage retreats at Ridgecrest are available.

Evangelism and Church Growth Director Duane Caldwell reported that nineteen people, representing seven churches, attended the Servanthood Evangelism Workshop.

Finance Committee Chairman Jimmy Weathers presented the August Financial Report and the proposed budget for the year 2001. Mr. Weathers made a motion that the proposed budget be presented at the annual meeting. The vote carried.

Music and Worship Director Nanette Warren expressed appreciation to Corinth and Ephesus Baptist Churches for hosting the Associational Hymn Sings. She invited

participation in the Christmas Caroling planned for December 19.

Royal Ambassador Director Stephen Moore expressed appreciation for the privilege of serving as the RA Director. He reported that training was held for RA Leaders at the Associational Key Leadership in August. He said that if anyone needed help with the RA program to call the Associational Center.

Georgette Burnette, reporting for WMU Director Kathy Robles, announced a Day of

Prayer to be held November 5 at Social Plains Baptist Church.

Elvis Pereira, Pastor at the Hispanic Mission Victoria En Cristo, said that his first priority as pastor is to strengthen the church. He said that the congregation at Victoria en Cristo is stronger and more spiritually mature. He reported the following: Tithing by mission members has grown seventy-five percent. A regular Lord's Supper observance has been established at the mission, and regular business meetings are held. The average attendance in Sunday School is seventy-five people and in worship is ninety people. Four weddings were performed this year. Eight people have been baptized. Five ministries have been started. Three deacons were ordained. The mission has a Minister of Music and a Minister of Education. percent of the budget goes to missions. A constitution will be voted on in November. Rev. Pereira said that he is working to start a Bible study in the Louisburg area. He said that the mission has outgrown their facility and they are ready to build a church. He said the mission has a building fund, but land is needed. Rev. Pereira expressed appreciation to Bailey Baptist Church for sponsoring the mission. (Translation was done by Connie Waters.)

Martin Lutero, from Massachusetts, presented special music. He will be in

concert September 29 at Corinth Baptist Church.

Church and Community Ministries Director Gail Nelms expressed appreciation to the volunteers who helped with the Diaper Changing/Cold Water Station at the Tar River Festival in Louisburg September 16. She reported that Acteens from Flat Rock Baptist Church helped to make 175 salvation bracelets with children and youth who attended the festival, and Russell Whitfield and the youth shared the gospel through song with puppers. Mrs. Nelms reported that volunteers at the festival gave out 1,000 cups of water with scripture written on the cups. She announced the need for volunteers to help with the Diaper Changing/Cold Water Station at the Spring Hope Pumpkin Festival October 7. Mrs. Nelms reported sixteen people in the morning and forty people in the evening are attending Spanish classes which began September 7. She expressed appreciation to Connie Waters for teaching the Spanish classes at the Associational Center. Mrs. Nelms reported that preparations are being made for the Toy Ministry. She said that toys are needed, funds to buy Bibles are needed, and She reported that more than 500 children were helped during volunteers are needed. the 1999 toy ministry.

Interim Director of Missions George Shore reported an error in the October The article about the golf tournament said that the proceeds would be newsletter. used for a fence to put on the associational property. Actually the proceeds will be used for an ice maker. Any money left over will go towards the fence. Dr. Shore expressed appreciation for the privilege of serving as Interim Director of Missions. He said that he was grateful for the participation in the WMU Fall Workshop, the Baptist Men's Rally, the Servanthood Evangelism Workshop, the Volunteer Appreciation Banquet, and the Spanish ministry. He announced a meeting to be held at Rock Spring October 10 to discuss demographics and information about the communities surrounding the churches. Dr. Shore encouraged participation in Operation Inasmuch October 28.

DOM Search Committee Co-Chairperson C. Ray Pruette recognized the members of the Search Committee. He said that the committee has worked for seven months in unity. He expressed appreciation to Georgette Burnette and Gail Nelms for their willingness to do whatever was needed. Dr. Pruette explained that the Search Committee sought a person to minister to every pastor and to work with every church in the association. He explained the process: When the committee began work in March 2000 their first business was to find an interim. They hired Dr. George Shore

as Interim Director of Missions. Next, they built a profile for a Director of Missions. They received more than fifty resumes. After reading the resumes they began interviews. The committee selected seven applicants for further study and did a second interview with some. Then the committee made a selection. Dr. Pruette said that the Search Committee recommends Rev. Dougald McLaurin be hired as Director of Missions of Tar River Baptist Association. He said that the committee sought God's will at all times and spent much time in prayer.

Dr. Pruette introduced Rev. Dougald McLaurin, pastor at Nashville Baptist

Church. Rev. McLaurin shared his testimony.

After a time of question and answers, Bill Pyle called for the question and made a motion that the vote be taken. James Wheless seconded the motion. The vote

BAILEY - Construction on our new education building began. Minister of Youth Geoff Prows was ordained. We began FAITH evangelism which resulted in the largest number of baptisms and additions in the history of our church in a single year. A baby dedication service was held.

BETHLEHEM - We participated in the Christmas Toy Store and helped with a community

food pantry. Four people were baptized.

BEULAH CHRISTIAN - We helped rebuild housing for flood victims (Princeville Project). We helped build onto a church and supplied the materials (Mt. Airy Project). We started a weekly singles ministry. We sent money and supplies for a church in Laurel, Montana. Our participation in the Belarussian Ministry included holding fundraisers to support the ministry and housing eighteen children from Russia for six weeks. Our evangelism team did community outreach. I. OPERATING EXPENSES: Services, utilities, and equipment are essential in assisting the association to fulfill its purpose. Although these things are not identified as ministries, they complement and lend support to the ministries of the association. \$ 1,500.00 ANNUAL AUDIT: At the Board Meeting (6/26/00) the association voted to hire a CPA to do an annual audit of the books/financial records. These funds will cover the audit expense. \$ ASSOCIATIONAL ANNUALS: Associational Annuals will be printed and distributed to the churches of the association. 500.00 Churches requesting copies will be required to pay the printing cost of the copies they receive. The Association will provide copies to be mailed to certain institutions and agencies, and a sufficient number of copies to be filed and to be used with committees and new pastors or staff. 50.00 BANK SERVICE CHARGES: Money is allocated to cover normal banking service charges. \$ 1,000.00 BUILDING MAINTENANCE: These funds will be used to make necessary repairs to the Tar River Baptist Association's building. These funds will also cover the cost of an

exterminator and regular checks of the fire extinguishers.

CARDS (BIRTHDAY, ANNIVERSARY, AND SYMPATHY): Cards will be sent to each minister and each member of his family on the occasions of birthdays, anniversaries, and bereavement.

\$ 1,000.00	CCM TRAVEL REIMBURSEMENT: The CCM Director is reimbursed for all business travel up to a maximum of \$1,000 annually. It is understood that the total amount may not be needed.
\$ 300.00	COMPUTER SOFTWARE AND SUPPLIES: Necessary software and supplies will be provided for efficiency and effectiveness in the work of the association.
\$ 1,000.00	CONTINGENCY: These funds will be used to cover the cost of unforeseen expenses.
\$ 1,000.00	COPIER SERVICE: These funds cover the cost of a service contract on the Canon copier. This contract covers everything except paper.
\$ 250.00	CUSTODIAL SUPPLIES: Cleaning supplies will be provided to maintain the Associational Center. Such items include cleaning materials, deodorizers, disinfectants, waxes, paper towels, toilet tissue, mops, brooms, rags, trashbags, and other necessary items.
\$ 400.00	EQUIPMENT REPAIR: This estimated amount will be used to repair equipment as needed.
\$ 500.00	HOSPITALITY: The Director of Missions may access this fund to provide lodging, food, and other necessary hospitality for associational guests. He may also use these monies for breakfast, luncheon, or dinner meetings with pastors or lay persons that he feels are necessary to the work or fellowship of the association (including orientation sessions with new ministers or staff). These funds are also used to keep coffee and beverages in the office for guests.
\$ 300.00	KITCHEN SUPPLIES: Paper products (plates, napkins, cups, table coverings) and plastic dinnerware are needed for meals and/or refreshments that are served in connection with meetings held in our facility. These funds will be used to keep a stock of these supplies.
\$ 150.00	MEMORIALS: These funds will be used to send flowers or other appropriate items at the death or serious illness of those who are serving in responsible places of leadership. Consideration will also be given to those who have served significantly in the past.
\$ 300.00	NEW EQUIPMENT: These funds will be used for the purchase of new equipment. All purchases will be made only with the approval of the Finance Committee.
\$ 5,000.00	OFFICE INSURANCE: Insurance coverage includes contents, liability, workman's compensation, malpractice, and bonding for the secretary, treasurer, and assistant treasurer.
\$ 1,500.00	OFFICE SUPPLIES: These funds will provide the necessary supplies to adequately do the work of the association.
\$ 5,000.00	OFFICE UTILITIES: These funds will be used to pay for electricity, water, and fuel for the Associational Center.
\$ 1,950.00	PAYROLL TAXES: These funds provide the association's portion of Social Security taxes for the Secretary and the CCM Director.
\$ 150.00	PETTY CASH: This money is kept in the office to cover returned mail and other incidentals. The Secretary keeps receipts on all petty cash expenditures.
\$ 3,000.00	POSTAGE: Postage will be provided for promotional mailings, correspondence, and "CURRENTS OF THE TAR."

\$ 4,500.00	PRINTING: "CURRENTS OF THE TAR," envelopes, and other printed forms and materials are essential to the work of the association.	
\$ 500.00	RESERVE FUND: Money (\$41.66) will be taken monthly from the checking account and deposited into the designated account to be held in reserve for emergencies.	
\$ 225.00	SECRETARY'S TRAINING: These funds cover registration fees and expenses for the secretary to attend the North Carolina Baptist Secretaries' Association Conference in November.	
\$ 200.00	SECRETARY'S TRAVEL: The secretary is reimbursed for all business travel up to a maximum of \$200 annually. It is understood that the total amount may not be needed.	
\$ 2,500.00	TELEPHONE AND INTERNET SERVICE: These funds provide telephone services to facilitate the work of the association. The internet makes e-mail available and provides a wealth of helpful and useable information.	

II. PROMOTIONAL EXPENSES: We will endeavor to make the work of the Association and its churches highly visible throughout the area as well as provide a Christian witness.

\$ 300.00	BROCHURES: These funds will be used to purchase needed brochures to promote the ministries of the association.
-0-	NEWSPAPERS: Area newspapers will be utilized to advertise special events and promotions.
-0-	RADIO AND TELEVISION: We will use both radio and television for special announcements and promotions.
\$ 300.00	VOLUNTEERS APPRECIATION BANQUET: These funds will be used to provide a dinner on September 22 to express appreciation to all who have served as volunteers in associational events or activities. These funds are provided by the Baptist State Convention.

III. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION MINISTRIES: The association exists to serve and strengthen the churches. Part of our task is to assist the churches in their educational programs and to encourage the individual church itself to be on mission. Associational leaders are available to interpret association or convention programs already in place, assist the church to adapt these programs to meet its needs, create a model for a particular church where nothing is available to meet its need, and assist the individual church to discover and embark on its own mission opportunities.

SUNDAY SCHOOL:

\$ 100.00	ASSOCIATIONAL RESOURCE SPECIALIST TRAINING: The TRBA Associational Resource Specialist will attend the state training session. These funds will provide gasoline for travel, literature, and materials our team will need to do their work.
\$ 300.00	ASSOCIATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL TRAINING EVENT: This training event will provide an excellent opportunity for experienced and beginning teachers, leaders, and workers to get a better understanding of the characteristics and needs of the age-group with which they work.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL:

\$ 550.00 LITERATURE AND SUPPLIES: VBS literature and necessary supplies will be provided for those on our VBS Council.

\$ 250.00 ASSOCIATIONAL VBS CLINICS: An Early Bird Clinic for VBS Directors and Pastors will be conducted April 10 with a light supper beginning at 6:30 pm. A clinic for all VBS workers is scheduled for May 10 at 7:00 pm. These funds will defray costs of materials, food, and other clinic expenses.

DISCIPLESHIP TRAINING:

- BIBLE DRILL & CELEBRATION: An Associational Bible Drill will be provided for children (grades 4-6), youth (grades 7-9), and a Youth Speakers' Tournament (grades 10-12). The tournament will be followed by a "Celebration of Learning" in which children will be treated to a special meal and surprises. The leaders will also be recognized. The goal of the celebration will be to help the Drill and Speaker participants see that learning is a great reason to be joyful and to celebrate God's work in our lives. The budget will provide for drill and celebration supplies, food, and associational recognition of participants and leaders. This event will be held April 6.
- \$ 75.00 BIBLE DRILL LEADERS/JUDGES TRAINING CONFERENCE: A conference will be provided to help Tar River churches plan for the Bible Drill season and to be on the cutting edge of helping our young people prepare themselves with needed Bible skills and Biblical understanding. All interested and/or prospective Bible Drill leaders are encouraged to attend this training conference scheduled for August 21. The session will provide the basics for new Bible Drill leaders and updated information for the experienced leaders.
- \$ 500.00 DEACON DINNER & TRAINING: A dinner event will be provided for deacons and spouses on March 19. An emphasis on leadership and discipleship, needed in our churches today, will be determined and followed. Special features, music, ADS team members, and a guest speaker will communicate the central theme. Budget will provide for promotion, supplies, speaker honorarium, travel, etc.
- S 200.00 DISCIPLESHIP MODEL: One relevant discipleship process will be provided throughout the association to acquaint pastors and/or church leaders with alternative discipling tools. This will also be an opportunity for leaders to continue to grow and develop themselves spiritually. Budget will provide facilitator honorarium, materials and supplies, and light refreshments for the session.
- S 225.00 DISCIPLESHIP PROJECTS: Specific discipling projects will be determined according to needs expressed in the strategy meetings. Budget will provide the means to conduct various projects as outlined. As many projects as possible will be conducted according to time and resources.
- \$ 300.00 DISCIPLING RESOURCES FOR ASSOCIATIONAL LIBRARY: Various resources of a discipling nature will be purchased and placed in the associational resource center to be available for churches to check out for use. The purpose is to help facilitate quality discipling experiences in a day and age when the cost of videos, leader guides, and other tools are sometimes cost prohibitive.
- \$ 60.00 DISCIPLESHIP UPDATE: Associational leaders will be trained in the latest resources and discipling tools available to enable them to share intelligently with churches. Budget will provide registration fee for this event.

\$	100.00	STRATEGY MEETING: A small group strategy meeting scheduled for September 10 will be held to determine discipling directions. Participants will be invited based on their current situation to give input related to discipling needs and interests. Budget will provide for promotion, materials and resources, and meals.

In addition, our association receives about 10% of the total amount contributed by the churches of the Tar River Baptist Association to be used for our own mission causes. These funds will be used to promote the North Carolina Missions Offering.

\$	100.00	team points. TRAINING FOR BROTHERHOOD AND RA LEADERS: This training will be offered at the Key Leadership Conference scheduled for August 20. These funds will provide honorariums for the facilitators of this training.

MUSIC:

- \$ 25.00 CHRISTMAS CAROLING: The date for this activity is December 18. The purpose is to provide the music of the season for persons in area hospitals, rest homes, and nursing facilities.
- \$ 200.00 CHORAL CLINIC: The purpose of this clinic is to strengthen the music ministry of the churches of the TRBA. The date for this event is May 3. It is designed to offer help for Music Directors, Instrumentalists, and Choir Members.
- \$ 50.00 HYMN SINGS: The major thrusts of these events are to promote fellowship, enjoy singing the hymns of our faith, and acquaint the people of the Association with hymns they do not know or have not been singing. Hymn Sing I is scheduled for September 23. Hymn Sing II is scheduled for September 30.

YOUTH MINISTRIES:

\$ 400.00 YOUTH EVENTS: The Youth Council will plan and conduct youth events during the year. This funding will be used to provide leadership for these events. Should additional funds be needed, they will be secured through youth projects or by requiring participants to help defray the costs associated with these events. Dates and details of events are to be announced later.

EVANGELISM:

- \$ 600.00 EVANGELISM TRAINING: Training opportunities will be offered for pastors and laity. These funds will provide for seminar leaders, supplies, materials, and promotion.
- \$ 500.00 JESUS VIDEO DISTRIBUTION: This video, purchased with these funds, will be distributed by the association's Evangelism Council.

MEDIA-LIBRARY:

- RESOURCES: The Media Center should provide resources for every phase of church programming. We are building a wealth of media resources to enhance and strengthen the work of the churches. Such needed resources include new books, audio-visual materials, and supplies to catalog and maintain all associational owned media and media equipment. Through a Cooperative Agreement, the Baptist State Convention provides these funds.
- \$ 100.00 MEDIA CONFERENCE: A qualified consultant will conduct the conference on June 9 at the Associational Center. These funds will be used to defray costs associated with this conference.

KEY LEADERSHIP CONFERENCES:

- \$ 250.00 STATE KEY LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE: The Key Leaders of the TRBA will attend this training event at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly, Fort Caswell. These funds will provide gasoline and meals while en route to and from Caswell. Lodging will be provided by the Baptist State Convention.
- \$ 200.00 ASSOCIATIONAL KEY LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE: Key leaders from the churches of the association will be invited to attend this annual event. These funds will be used to provide travel and honorarium for a special guest speaker. The date of this conference is August 20.

ASSOCIATION IN SESSION:

- \$ 400.00 SPRING MEETING: This annual event will be held April 23. These funds will provide necessary supplies and speakers.
- \$ 400.00 FALL MEETING: This annual event will be held October 29. These funds will provide necessary supplies and speakers.

IV. CHURCH DEVELOPMENT: These funds are to be used in implementing the work of the North Central Region ministries of the five Baptist Associations comprised of the Tar River, Beulah, Cullom, Flat River and North Roanoke Baptist Associations. It also includes funds for the purchase of property for new work or new churches in targeted areas of the Association.

- \$ 1,200.00 DESIGNATED ACCOUNT FOR NEW WORK: \$100.00 will be taken monthly from the Regular Account and deposited into the Designated Account to be held there for the purchase of property in areas where new work needs to begin. Studies and/or surveys will be conducted to determine the need for a new work/church in a given area.
- \$ 3,000.00 NORTH CENTRAL REGION MINISTRIES: These funds are to be used in cooperation with the other four associations in the North Central Regional Ministries. The Regional Ministries is a program of five associations working together to create better futures for the churches and the communities they serve. This is necessary because of a twenty percent reduction of funding from the Baptist State Convention.

V. DIRECT MISSION MINISTRIES: There are many people in our area who are in need of a special ministry. No one church can minister to all of their needs. Our direct mission ministries makes it possible to involve many of our churches in "giving a cup of cold water" in Jesus' name. As we meet needs, we bear witness of the love of God in Christ Jesus.

- -O- LAKE ROYALE: Volunteers conduct services at Lake Royale each Sunday. This work is self-supporting.
- -O- BUNN PRISON: Sunday services are conducted each week of every other month. These services are conducted by volunteers.
- -O- LOUISBURG MANOR: Volunteers conduct services each Friday for the residents of this facility.
- -O- CHRISTMAS TOY MINISTRY: Churches of the Association provide toys and other items to be used to assist needy families at Christmas. Volunteers will conduct this ministry of care and evangelism during the month of December.
- \$ 300.00 DIAPER CHANGING/COLD WATER STATION: A station will be set up for parents to change the diapers of their children. We also provide cups of cold water. Volunteers will be available to offer Bibles, tracts, and information about the Tar River Baptist Association. Festivals where this ministry will be performed include Louisburg's Tar River Festival (September 15) and Spring Hope's Pumpkin Festival (October 6).
- \$ 5,400.00 HISPANIC MINISTRY (VICTORIA EN CRISTO): The budgeted amount is a contribution toward the salary for the Hispanic pastor. Through a Cooperative Agreement, the Baptist State Convention will provide \$2,400 of this amount.

VI. SHORT-TERM MISSION MINISTRIES: Our association is composed of people from varied backgrounds and cultures. People with special needs must not be overlooked. We will provide training to help meet the needs of people with special needs and persons of other cultures.

- \$ 1,500.00 TRAINING IN CONVERSATIONAL SPANISH: Our goal is to teach people the simplest way to converse in Spanish in an effort to share the love of God. These monies will be used to compensate an instructor and to provide the necessary supplies.

 \$ 600.00 TRAINING IN DEAF INTERPRETATION: These funds will be used to provide an instructor and necessary materials for those who want to learn to communicate with our silent friends.
- \$ 500.00 TUTORIAL MINISTRY: This is a missions outreach program.

 Committed Christian volunteers will help children with basic academic skills as an expression of Christ's love and concern. These funds will be used for instructional materials and refreshments. Volunteers will be used as tutors. The total amount in this line item is provided by the Baptist State Convention through a cooperative agreement.

The entire amount in this line item has been provided by the Baptist State Convention through a cooperative agreement.

VII. PARTNERSHIP MISSIONS: In cooperation with the Baptist State Convention, we will partner with other countries and states in an effort to be mutually helpful in establishing new churches and strengthening the work of existing churches.

- \$ 2,400.00 ALASKA: The Baptist State Convention began a partnership with Alaska in January, 2000. These funds will enable our churches and people to be involved in the partnership.
- \$ 1,000.00 SOUTH AFRICA: This partnership ends in October 2001. The association will provide some assistance to those who want to be involved in this partnership but will need some financial assistance.

VIII. SEMINARY EXTENSION: Within our association there are both ministers and lay persons who want to know more about the Bible and to be more effective in their service to the Master. Seminary Extension is an ideal way to provide that kind of training.

- \$ 150.00 SEMINARY EXTENSION: We plan to offer Seminary Extension classes during the year. These funds will help to defray some of the expense.
- IX. MINISTERIAL EDUCATION: Continuing educational opportunities are often available for some of our pastors who are unable to attend because of financial limitations. Through this phase of our budget we will be able to offer partial scholarships to pastors who want to attend but have no church budgeted or personal funding.
 - \$ 600.00 MINISTERIAL EDUCATION: The total amount in this line item has been provided by the Baptist State Convention through a cooperative agreement.
- X. REVISIONING PROJECT: This project will target six churches that need to experience revision and become revitalized.
 - \$ 1,800.00 REVISIONING PROJECT: The total amount in this line item has been provided by the Baptist State Convention through a cooperative agreement.
- XI. PERSONNEL EXPENSES: The on-going, day-to-day planning, administration, coordination, and office work of the Association lends support to all associational ministries. This also includes custodial maintenance.

Annuity Board Report

The Annuity Office of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina in partnership with the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention provides services related to retirement planning, financial support of ministers and other church employees, life and health insurance programs, and church/clergy tax issues. During this past year numerous conferences, consultations, etc. were conducted to service our churches and church employees related to these issues. Education continues to be a number one priority since so many people do not participate in the plans simply because they are not aware of the great benefits.

On January 1, 2000, the Annuity Board began offering The Ministers' Annuity This new product is particularly designed for the minister who has self-employment income from performing services (i.e. weddings, funerals, revivals, writing) as a Southern Baptist minister, and others who may not qualify for one of the other Annuity Board retirement plans. Eligibility can be determined by

contacting the Annuity Board's customer service.

The Southern Baptist Convention in annual session in June, 2000, approved changes to the Annuity Board's Mission Statement and two new Ministry Assignments. The changes will now allow the Annuity Board to offer personal investing for Southern Baptist ministers and denominational employees and their spouses, and to assist churches and denominational entities by making available institutional investment services through cooperative agreements with state Baptist foundations.

As of May 31, 2000, there were 4,561 active participants in the annuity retirement plan from 61% of our North Carolina churches. The money contributed by individuals, churches, and the matching contributions from the state convention are invested according to the individual participant's financial goals and risk tolerance with the overall aim to help participants ensure their security in old The number of persons in North Carolina receiving retirement benefits totals age. 2,807 with another 368 assisted through the Adopt An Annuitant and Relief ministries. Funds for supplemental assistance are provided from the Cooperative Program, the Retired Ministers' Support Fund, and the Adopt An Annuitant plan.

In our ministry, relationships are everything -- relationships with children, with families, with placement agencies, with our own families and churches, and with each other. We are blessed by God in this work because we honor God in

relationships.

During the QSTQR emphasis, all BCH staff at every ministry point have made extra efforts to strengthen relationships with people we encounter. We have incorporated the terms quality, service, and relationships into a plan of action. We have reflected our desire for quality relationships in everything we do in order to deliver quality services that change lives. QSTQR, celebrating the mission...the millennium...the ministry, was BCH's theme from Easter, 1999 through Thanksgiving, 2000.

Through Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, hundreds of children and families are given new hope for their futures...

Children like Linda and her two younger sisters. Linda feared for their well being. It was her responsibility to care for her sisters. Linda remembers moving to a shelter where she finally felt they were safe; there was enough food for the sisters and warm beds. The three children were later placed at BCH. Now, Linda is in a place where others care for her. Linda has discovered God cares for her, too.

The McDonalds found the challenge of being a blended family difficult at times. Their son began to exhibit anger towards his parents. He would challenge their authority and began getting in trouble with some neighborhood kids. The situation was getting out of control. Corey's parents called BCH, where they found a staff willing to embrace their family with hope. Today, Corey has begun to deal with his anger, mistrust, and behavior issues. His parents are learning how to better communicate with each other and with Corey.

During the past year, BCH served 1800 children and families through 13 facilities statewide. BCH operates residential campuses in Thomasville, Pembroke, Kinston, and Clyde; a maternity home in Asheville; a teen mother/baby home in Lenoir; values change homes for girls in Franklin and Lenoir; therapeutic camping for boys in Cameron; emergency care cottages at the residential campuses and in

Waynesville and Asheville; and a model day care center in Thomasville.

In 2000, BCH began a new, innovative ministry caring for developmentally disabled adults and their families. Our Trustees unanimously approved a major undertaking this year by committing more than \$3.5 million to replace, repair, construct, and make much-needed improvements at every BCH location. Most of the work is complete. You are invited to visit our campuses and other facilities to see

first hand the difference you are helping to make.

The commitment to quality has been a cornerstone of this institution since its beginning. "Quality Service Through Quality Relationships" was a 20-month public demonstration of this cornerstone. The emphasis places top priority on relationships to achieve the highest quality of service possible. Significant growth has been realized during this period. BCH has dedicated new structures at Odum Home, Cameron Boys Camp, Kennedy Home, Broyhill, and Mills Home campuses and added new work in Waynesville and Asheville as well as Moody Home, Care House, Noel Group Home. Several significant anniversaries have been observed: the 85th of Kennedy Home in Kinston, the 30th of Baptist Maternity Home in Asheville, the 20th of Cameron Boys Camp, the 40th of annual Western Area Conference, and the 115th anniversary of Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina.

To help commemorate BCH's 115th anniversary and to celebrate the impact QSTQR has had on staff and children, approximately 600 children, administrators, childcare workers, social workers, and staff were brought together June 28, 2000, from around the state for a day of inspiration, fellowship, food, and fun. "The Family Gathering" was held at Mills Home where BCH began in 1885. This is the first time all the Baptist Children's Homes' "family" have been together at the same place and

at the same time.

Baptist Children's Homes QSTQR emphasis will culminate at Thanksgiving. We invite you to attend BCH's 30-minute presentation at the 2000 annual meeting of the Baptist State Convention in Winston-Salem on Tuesday, November 14, 2000, at 2:10 pm. We encourage you to be a part of our ambitious \$1 million Thanksgiving Offering goal. That number may seem enormous, but there is also enormous need. For all the good North Carolina Baptists are doing to help children and families, there is still so much that needs to be done. We are confident our churches will help us meet this important goal!

The Baptist Foundation

The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in increasing an awareness among North Carolina Baptists of Christian estate stewardship principles as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased financial support. The Foundation accomplishes these objectives by offering assistance in estate planning counsel, will preparation, planned giving, charitable remainder trusts, endowment funds and church fund management.

During 1999, the Foundation provided assistance to individuals in establishing 20 endowment funds and 12 charitable remainder trusts totaling \$3.8 million and

received \$2.8 million in contributions to existing endowments all of which will ultimately benefit countless Baptist causes on a permanent basis. Programs were provided for 122 churches and associations during the year to promote Make Your Will Month, Christian estate stewardship, and church fund management. Over \$3 million from churches and institutions came under management to enhance numerous ministries including scholarships, building funds, cemetery funds, benevolence funds, general operating funds and other various mission causes.

The Foundation employs professional money managers to invest these funds according to an investment policy adopted by its Board. Four investment pools are offered: a growth fund, a balanced fund, an income fund and a fixed income fund. The Foundation uses the services of Salomon Smith Barney to help select top money

managers and evaluate performance.

As of December 31,1999, the Foundation held \$93,355,200 under management. This an increase of more than \$12.5 million over 1998. During 1999, \$1,864,044 was distributed to individuals and \$3,418,543 to Baptist work for a total distribution of \$5,282,587. During the 80-year history of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. \$16,081,204 has been distributed to individuals and \$25,723,551 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$41,804,755.

The Baptist Hospital

Hospital Carries the Mission

In May of 2000, the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. celebrated 77 years of regional, national, and international service. During these years the hospital has been faithful to the initial vision of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. When the hospital opened, the convention stated the reason for doing so was to extend the healing ministry which was demonstrated by Jesus Christ. Many challenges have been faced through these years, but the commitment to compassionately strive for innovative excellence has remained the same. Baptist Benevolent Care Fund

Baptist churches from all across North Carolina joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina in 1924. In 1999 the MDO amounted to \$531,452. These funds were used exclusively to help patients who had minimal or no health care insurance or no other financial means to pay their hospital bills. From the offering this past year, well over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our

Baptist churches in North Carolina.

School of Pastoral Care

During the year, the Department of Chaplaincy and Pastoral Education provided worship services in Davis Chapel on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday, as well as services in the J. Paul Sticht Center. Chaplain supervisors, residents and interns made more than 50,000 ministry contacts last year. The Department's fully accredited Clinical Pastoral Education program graduated 65 students.

The Department of Pastoral Counseling, CareNet, Inc. continues to develop its ministries. There are now 16 Christian counseling centers located across the state. The newest center is now open in Greenville and is the staging ground for serving northeast North Carolina. During the year these professionally staffed centers provided 27,293 hours of Christian counseling, making CareNet the largest pastoral counseling system in the United States.

The Center for Congregational Health, Inc. continues to develop its mission of helping congregations become healthier communities of faith. Programs and assistance offered to churches include Intentional Interim Ministry, strategic planning, staff and team development, and conflict management. Resources for ministers include: Young Leaders Program, Leadership Development Group, Interim Ministry Training, and Intentional Interim Ministry training. The Center has served an average of 21 North Carolina Baptist congregations a month during the past year. Facts about Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center

- . With more than 9,600 employees, we are the largest employer in Forsyth and Guilford counties.
- . A Certificate of Need was granted for a 47,000 square foot Downtown Health Plaza to be built replacing the Reynolds Health Center, which provides health care for underserved people in Forsyth and surrounding counties.
- . Building strong relationships with the community is important to us. A recent survey indicates that Medical Center employees donate more than 30,000 hours of volunteer service a year to more than 300 different organizations in our area.

. Construction has begun on a 35,000 square foot addition atop Ardmore Tower. This will provide more space for Brenner Children's Hospital as well as additional operating suites and private patient rooms.

Additional Points of Emphasis and Progress

New Dental Program For Indigent Children - Baptist Hospital has become a major participant in a community partnership to provide dental care for indigent children. NCBH opened a dental clinic on May 8, 2000, where three dentists are reaching hundreds of children who previously had little or no access to dental services. Children who had known dental pain as a way of life, or who never had routine services because their parents could not afford it, are now being treated.

Physician Excellence - In 1999, 600 physicians in North Carolina were listed among "The Best Doctors in America"; 95 are WFUBMC physicians. Nursing Excellence - Baptist Hospital was one of the first hospitals in the nation to receive Magnet Recognition for Excellence in Nursing, demonstrating exemplary nursing leadership and quality patient care from the American Nurses Credentialing Center, the nation's leading nursing credentialing organization. Ranked Among the Nation's Best - North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. continues to be ranked among America's best hospitals in ten of 16 specialties, according to rankings published in the July, 2000, issue of U.S. News & World Report. This ranking reflects the reputation of specialists at NCBH as seen by their peers across the nation.

Newest Treatment for Epilepsy - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center offers a new treatment for epilepsy - a "pacemaker for the brain" that can help control seizures in patients who are not helped by medication and are ineligible for

The quality of life the "Homes" has brought to these Older Adults has been its best measure of success as it has helped ensure that residents live out their lives with autonomy, dignity, and comfort. The "Homes" dream is to make life for North Carolina Older Adults what God intended it to be..."The Best of Times."

The "Homes" corporation now owns and operates four retirement communities

across the state: the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem, a continuing care community offering independent living, assisted living and nursing care; the Western North Carolina Home in Asheville, a community that offers assisted living and nursing care; and the Hamilton Home in Hamilton and The Taylor House in Albemarle, communities that offer assisted living services. Later this year the "Homes" will begin construction on a new community - The Gardens of Taylor Glen, a continuous care community near Concord.

The earliest version of the Recorder was founded in 1833 by Thomas Meredith, who had also been influential in the birth of the Baptist State Convention in 1830. The Biblical Recorder was owned and operated as a private enterprise in support of Baptist work in North Carolina until 1938, when the paper was purchased by the Baptist State Convention and incorporated as an agency of the convention.

A number of able editors have served the Biblical Recorder, which is widely

acknowledged to be in the top echelon of state Baptist papers. The current editor is

Tony W. Cartledge, whose tenure began on January 1, 1999.

The Biblical Recorder plays a strategic role in promoting God's kingdom work through North Carolina Baptists. On April 22, 1999, the Board of Directors of the Biblical Recorder adopted the following mission statement: "Our Mission is to further Christ's kingdom by providing relevant news, insightful opinions and supportive resources to North Carolina Baptists in a timely and accessible fashion."

The Biblical Recorder belongs to all North Carolina Baptists, and appropriately reflects the geographical, ecclesiological, and theological diversity that is typical of the churches making up the Baptist State Convention. The editors and staff of the Recorder work diligently to offer a fair and balanced presentation of the news that most affects the life and ministry of North Carolina Baptists. Opinions advanced through editorials, letters, and analytical essays help to spark the thinking of North Carolina Baptists who want to make up their own minds about important issues. Feature stories about notable or innovative activities of churches and associations, regular reports on partnership missions efforts, and weekly commentaries on the most popular Sunday School lessons offer ideas, encouragement, and inspiration to readers of the Recorder.

To communicate more effectively and to present the most important news in a more timely fashion, the Biblical Recorder has developed a popular presence on the World Wide Web. The Recorder's website at www.biblicalrecorder.org offers Internet users an opportunity to read much of each paper's content several days before printed versions arrive. This is particularly helpful during convention meetings and at other times when frequent updates are desirable. Christian Values

a. The Christian Action League again co-sponsored the Fifth Annual Christian Heritage Week of North Carolina held in March. It was our pleasure to provide awards for excellence to those high school students who won the essay contest on America's Christian background.

b. CAL has continued to promote and distribute copies of the Ten Commandments

c. Promoted awareness of worldwide persecution of Christians (particularly in Sudan) through e-mail alerts and radio.

e. Joined with Family Life Ministries in promoting and distributing copies of the Marriage Covenant Certificates.

f. Participated in the National Day of Prayer.

g. Set up CAL exhibit at Baptist State Convention and the East and West

Districts of the Wesleyan Church conferences.

h. Worked in the General Assembly to stop a bill that would allow physicians to take immediate custody of a child that they felt had been abused. The bill died in committee.

B. Radio

"Christians in Action," Station WAGO (88.7 FM) Snow Hill, started Monday, January 3, 2000. This broadcast consists of a five-minute commentary on issues that affect our lives today. We will begin airing this program August 7 on New Bern (WAAE, 91.9 FM). Our projection is to ultimately reach the whole state.

C. Gambling

- a. Video Poker Machines The Christian Action League worked around the clock to get video poker banned in this state. We failed getting the ban but were successful in getting SB 1542 to strengthen the law and restrict the operation and expansion of video gambling in the state. We will work vehemently next session in pushing for a ban.
- b. Joined Christian Coalition on how gubernatorial candidates stood on lottery/released results in newsletter.
- c. Next session the Christian Action League will be on the front line in the Legislature fighting a state-sponsored lottery.

D. Abortion

a. CAL has purchased the rights through donations of a surgical procedure on a 21-week old fetus that proves that partial-birth abortion is murder. We want to see this picture used extensively in making our case for the pro-life agenda.

b. CAL participated in the Right to Life Rally held in Raleigh.

E. Alcohol

a. Participated in four LBD campaigns since January 11, 2000, and there are three scheduled for a September referendum. We help with their organizational

meetings, rallies, and providing educational materials.

b. Worked in the General Assembly for passage of HB 1499-Interlock/Open Container law. This bill bans open alcohol containers in the passenger area of a motor vehicle on the highway or highway right-of-way. The bill was ratified on July 13.

F. Pornography

Have produced and aired several radio programs to inform the public of the internet pornography crisis. Educate communities on how they can rid their neighborhoods of adult establishments.

. Homosexuality

CAL monitors and informs the Christian community of the current homosexual

agenda through our e-mail alert.

The Christian Action League of North Carolina produces a quarterly newsletter The Beacon that has a distribution of over 21,000. We also send an e-mail alert every Friday to over 150 members to keep them abreast of current moral, ethical, and political issues that affect our state and nation. All services of the Christian Action League are provided at no charge. We depend on God's people to provide for His work.

Council on Christian Higher Education

Christian higher education represents one of our enduring values as North Carolina Baptists. From the founding of our Convention in 1830, we have supported Christian higher education. Our churches, associations, and state have benefited as a result.

Last year North Carolina Baptists provided special scholarship assistance to members from our churches who chose to attend one of our affiliated colleges or universities. Sixty-eight of eighty associations were represented among the hundreds of students who received this special Convention-sponsored scholarship assistance.

The institutions matched the Convention's support of these Baptist students through institutional support. For every dollar provided to students through the Cooperative Program, the institutions matched it with \$2.50 of additional financial assistance. Forty-five percent (45%) of the on-campus student populations are Baptists.

In addition to support of undergraduates, North Carolina Baptists assisted 297 divinity school students last year. This financial assistance was made possible through churches giving through optional giving Plans B and C. Members from our churches who have sensed God's call upon their lives to serve as ministers or missionaries are eligible to receive a theological educational grant from the Convention.

If a student pursues his/her degree from the divinity schools at Gardner-Webb or Campbell, the student is eligible to receive a grant of \$8,100. If a student pursues his or her theological education from other institutions, the student is eligible to receive a grant of \$3,000 for their studies.

Rev. Shane Kirby recently graduated from the M. Christopher White School of Divinity at Gardner-Webb University. Upon graduation, Mr. Kirby said, "I couldn't be more happy that I was able to obtain my master's at a North Carolina Baptist institution. I look at it like the Baptists of this state are interested in me. Now, I feel a sense of responsibility to the good people of my denomination to serve them."

North Carolina Baptists can take pride in graduates, like Mr. Kirby, who want to serve our Lord and His churches in North Carolina.

Without the faithful support of the Cooperative Mission Budget of the Baptist State Convention, opportunities for our members to attend Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill or Wingate would not be possible.

Thank you, North Carolina Baptists, for your continued support of Christian higher education in our state.
