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PROCEEDINGS.

Henderson, Granville Co., N. C., Thursday, Sept. 28th, 1876.

The Tar River Baptist Association convened with the church in this place to-day, in its Forty-sixth Annual Session.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder George M. Duke, from Psalms 133, 1st verse: "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity."

At 3 o'clock, P. M., the Moderator, Dr. Thos. J. Pitchford, of Warren, called the Association to order.

Prayer was offered by Elder J. D. Huf ham, of the *Recorder*. Brethren M. C. Duke and R. M. Freeman were appointed a Committee on Finance.

Elder J. A. Pitchford was appointed Reading Clerk.

The church at Henderson petitioned for a letter of dismission from this Association to join another of like faith and order.

The churches at Maple Spring, Mt. Zion and Pleasant Grove petitioned for the next Association.

Hawkins' Chapel asked for a letter of dismission.

On motion of Elder Duke, the Association was permanently organized by re-electing Dr. Thos. J. Pitchford, Moderator, and Dr. W. C. Lankford, Clerk and Treasurer.

Dr. Pitchford referred to the many times he had been honored by this position, and said he felt awed rather than flattered. As he advanced in years he felt more secure in his conviction of the truth of our principles. He counseled the churches to send young men, as well as old, as delegates, as they must soon take the seats of the aged.

Invitations were given to visiting brethren and messengers from other Associations, and seats were accepted by Elder R. H. Griffith, representing Southern Baptist Theological Seminary; Elder J. S. Purefoy, Agent Wake Forest

College; Dr. A. McDowell, Chowan Baptist Female Institute; Elder J. D. Hufham, *Biblical Recorder*; and Elder T. J. Horner, of Flat River Association.

Ministers of Tar River Association present, who are exofficio members: Dr. W. T. Brooks, J. A. Pitchford, G. M. Duke, W. J. Fulford, L. C. Perkinson, Walter Milne, M. R. Pinnell and P. H. Pinnell, and Daniel Wester, Licentiate.

The Clerk read the Constitution and Rules of Decorum.

The Pastor and Deacons of Henderson church were appointed a Committee on Religious Exercises during the Association.

The Clerk, Elder W. J. Fulford and Bro. A. W. Jackson were appointed a Committee of Arrangements.

Adjourned until to-morrow, 9 o'clock.

Committee.

The report was adopted.

The report on Foreign Missions was called for. Elder Pitchford asked to have it postponed until evening.

Report on State Missions called for. No report; post-poned.

Elders J. S. Purefoy, G. M. Duke and W. J. Fulford were appointed a Committee to nominate Ministers to preach Stated Sermons.

Brethren John Watson, Col. H. Harris and P. J. Dement were appointed a Committee to nominate Standing Committees.

Report on Ministerial Education was called for. Elder Bailey, the Committee, not being present, no report was presented.

Elder N. A. Purefoy arrived.

Dr. McDowell suggested a mass-meeting to-night on Ministerial Education.

Dr. Brooks moved to hold said mass-meeting at 7 o'clock. Adopted.

It was moved that Elder R. H. Griffith proceed to address

the Association on the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

The following is a synopsis of his remarks:

The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary is designed to furnish to those called of God to preach, opportunities for the study of the Bible, under the best possible advantages. When God calls a man to preach the Gospel, He calls him to study and to know that Gospel. A call to the ministry includes as much a call to know the Gospel, as one to preach it. God does not call one to teach what he does not know. Of all men, he, who feels in his heart that God has laid on him the work of the ministry, and feels a burning desire for the salvation of souls, most earnestly desires to understand the Bible. He will study it, and the Seminary is to give the best facilities therefor.

When God calls a man to preach, he ought to preach, he will preach, and woe is the man who comes in the name of God, when God has not sent him!

The Seminary is not designed to establish any class of ministers as above others, but simply and only to furnish to preachers the best possible advantages for studying the Bible—to furnish these advantages to any of our brethren in the ministry who can avail themselves of them.

All cannot go, but some can, and ought to go. It is better for a young minister to spend a year or two there and enjoy its advantages, and therehy gain a knowledge of the Bible, which otherwise, in the busy cares of the pastorate, and weekly toil for his support, it would take him many years to acquire. Many of our brethren have not had the advantages of a classical education, and can never have, to such the Seminary offers peculiar advantages, since it invites ministers who have only an English education, and gives to such the benefits of as thorough theological instruction as possible. Quite a number of these brethren who have been to the Seminary and been most benefitted by its advantages, have been those who knew nothing of Latin or Greek. Nor are its advantages restricted to young ministers. Brethren who have been preaching for years, and who have from experience felt the need of such advantages, have gone there and have declared themselves greatly benefitted. Pastors of our churches are invited to go to the Seminary and spend one or more sessions. A number have done so greatly to their pleasure and profit.

This is the only Seminary which the Southern Baptists have. Unless it is endowed it must close. The Baptists of North Carolina are asked to give only twenty-five thousand dollars towards this endowment. This can easily be done without oppressing any one and without injury to any of our other enterprises. It is proposed to raise it in bonds payable in five annual installments—the first installment payable next year, where one has not the means at hand to pay cash.

Dr. McDowell spoke for the interests of the Seminary and urged the Association to aid in endowing it.

Elder J. S. Purefoy said if our ministers who are even now in the ministry, would spend a winter in Greenville, they would be greatly benefitted.

The Clerk read the following

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

It would require an essay on this subject to do it justice and to impress its importance.

A statesman has recently said, that "books are the poor man's fortune;" he might more properly have applied it to newspapers. As a people, we are in stringent circumstances, financially. Thousands of the rising generation can never receive even what was once termed "an old-field education." Papers are cheap, and if parents will supply their children with good religious papers, their minds will become comparatively well educated, and the moral training will be of greater value than the education.

The Biblical Recorder, published in Raleigh, N. C., edited by Elders C. T. Bailey and J. D. Hufham, is warmly recommended. No Baptist in North Carolina can fail to subscribe for it without detriment to himself and family.

Elder Hufham spoke at length on the history and claims of the *Recorder*.

Dr. McDowell spoke warmly in its behalf.

Elder Griffith addressed a few personal remarks to one brother—that brother—who does not subscribe for the Recorder.

Elder P. H. Pinnell discussed its merits.

Brother Daniel Wester did not know how Elder Griffith discovered that he was not taking the Recorder, and went forward to subscribe.

The Moderator spoke at some length concerning the importance of reading and studying the Recorder.

Elder Perkinson spoke for its claims.

Bro. Horner thought it the duty of every parent to supply mental as well as physical food for his children, and this could be done by and through the rich columns of the Recorder.

Elder Fulford found that the *Recorder* was an educator in his family, besides it introduced him to every worker in the vineyard.

Elder Duke thought these speeches were all excellent, but he wanted something practical, something that would cause the brethren at home to subscribe for the *Recorder*. He urged that delegates use their influence in getting subscribers.

The Clerk offered the following resolution:

Resolved, By these delegates assembled, that we will appoint a Committee in our churches at our next church meeting, to procure subscribers to the Recorder.

Elders Milne and M. R. Pinnell advocated the resolution. The resolution was adopted.

Elder J. S. Purefoy thought the *Recorder* had *always* been good—it was a source of great information.

The report on Periodicals was adopted.

Invitations were again given to visiting brethren, Professors Charles E. Taylor and L. R. Mills, of Wake Forest College, and F. P. Hobgood, of Raleigh Female Seminary, accepted seats.

Bro. Cone was granted leave of absence.

Friday, 3 o'clock, P. M.

The following report was read on

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The purpose of this report is to suggest several topics implied in the Sabbath School work, the discussion of which will give comfort to those

who are zealous in this cause, and administer rebuke to those who are not. We all agree in the belief that our Lord's command to preach the Gospel to every creature is binding on His disciples now, and will be until He repeals it. Now I ask, can we preach unless we have first been taught? Preachers are teachers—can they preach the true gospel unless they have first been taught? and to this end I recommend Sabbath Schools as the most suitable place to train the young minds, to infuse a knowledge of the Blessed Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Doth not wisdom cry, and understanding put forth her voice, that we should teach our children the ways of holiness? Then we can say of a truth, as Solomon, the wise man, said, "A wise son maketh a glad father." I therefore recommend to every church and neighborhood the early organization of Sabbath Schools. An immense good can be done in this way for our Master's cause.

Christian parents, let me exhort you to be zealous workers in the Sabbath School. Bring your children up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Give them religious instructions in their youth, and it will make lasting impressions, it will sink deep in their hearts, and may be as bread cast upon the waters; you may reap your reward in some future day, and have cause to rejoice with some wayward son or daughter, who returned home and sought refuge in the arms of bleeding mercy. Yes, go to the Sabbath School, and their labor in your Master's vineyard. Be not slow to work; let us not hear the cry, "why stand ye here all the day idle." Go in at the eleventh hour and work for your Master's cause and you will receive your reward.

This is not only a work, but a fight against Satan, and the Sabbath School is the place to begin this fight while the hearts are young, before the evil one sows his seed. Let us fight the good fight of faith, looking to Jesus as the author and finisher of our faith, and we will surely pull down the works of Satan, and help to build up our Lord's Kingdom on earth. This will give us cause to rejoice, to see lost ones returning home and seeking refuge in a crucified but now risen Saviour. I do with all my heart recommend Sabbath Schools in every neighborhood.

Elder Fulford said, he always took an active interest in Sunday Schools. He intended to work in this field until schools were established in every church. Impressions were made upon his mind when five years of age in the Sunday School. This instruction would banish the isms and schisms of this day.

Prof. C. E. Taylor wished that the masses of the Baptist

ranks could hear the stirring and eloquent speeches that are made at our Conventions and Associations. He advocated Sunday School Institutes. In this way the great subject of Sunday Schools could reach the membership of our churches. Sunday Schools are not simply a place for children, but for every member of the church.

Elder Fulford stated that Union Meetings had been established in the lower part of the Association.

Brother Mills thought we should not pervert the Scriptures, and read the Fourth Commandment: "Remember the Sabbath day to 'sleep' it holy." He gives the history of an "Agriculturo-Sabbath School." He did not believe in uniting other interests with that of Sunday Schools.

Elder Duke discussed the subject at length.

Elder Huf ham thought the delegates here needed awakening on this subject as much as any others. If they become aroused, they will enliven the whole membership. In former days those who were gathered into the churches were persons of mature or advanced age; now, through the workings of the Sunday School, the youth of our land are being brought to Christ—thus giving their best days to God.

It was proposed to organize Sunday School Institutes. Several plans were suggested.

Elder J. S. Purefoy offered the following as an amendment to the report on Sunday Schools:

Resolved, That the churches of this Association be earnestly requested to unite, so far as may be, in the organization of Union meetings or Institutes, in which the subject of Sunday Schools may receive special attention.

Resolved, That four committees be appointed by the Moderator to take this matter under consideration.

Adopted.

The report was then adopted.

It was agreed that opportunity be given to visiting brethren, to-morrow at 10 o'clock, to speak on subjects relating to their agencies, schools, &c.

Elder Pitchford read the following report on

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

"Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." "How can they believe in him of whom they have not heard, and how can they hear without a preacher, and how can they preach except they be sent?" Such are some of the reasons why we, as Baptists, believe that the word of eternal life should be sent abroad. In all kindreds and tongues, climes and countries, where the glad tidings have been sent, they have been heard and received. Baptists, who this day unite their prayers with ours, for the universal reign of the meek and lowly Jesus; who to-day are holding their own Associations and Conventions, can well remember the time when they first heard and laughed at the name of Jesus. Some of our brethren of to-day can tell you that their fathers, if not themselves, once feasted on their own flesh and blood. While much has already been done, very much remains to be accomplished. While the enraptured shouts of ransomed thousands are ascending to the heavens from China, Italy, Burmah and the spice-bearing isles of the Pacific Ocean, the agonizing shrieks of perishing millions are crying to us to come over into Macedonia and help. Do we hear them? Do we hear our Saviour? Shall we help them?

Elder McDowell hoped this subject would receive full attention. It was important that all should understand it.

Elder Milne gave some interesting reminiscences of missionary life, and urged action and interest in this important field

Elder Hufham discussed the subject at large. Results had been great—in 100 years, two millions of heathen souls had been converted to God. Yet he did not want to see the countenance of Yates, when he shall read these minutes and learn that the Tar River Association, composed of 34 churches, has given only \$30 or \$40 for the preaching of the gospel to the heathen.*

Dr. McDowell felt that when he gave to Foreign Missions it was unselfish, and was the result of a pure motive.

The report was adopted.

A mass meeting was largely attended on Friday evening at 7 o'clock.

Subject: Ministerial Education.

Prof. Mills, of Wake Forest College, was first introduced. While he spoke eloquently upon the subject in general, he gave incidents in the lives of several ministers—most of them Beneficiaries—which would enlist the sympathies of a savage.

Elder Hufham followed in his charming manner, his inevitable wit and humor gushing through his forcible arguments and stern reasoning.

Elder Duke was called upon, and for a minute labored under a sense of his own deep feeling. His intense earnestness, his fine powers of elocution, and the recital of a portion of his ministerial experience, so impressed his audience that many were bathed in tears.

A collection was taken amounting to nearly one hundred dollars.

SATURDAY MORNING.

After singing, prayer was offered by Elder M. R. Pinnell. The Moderator announced the following arrangement on Sunday School Institutes:

The minutes of yesterday were read, amended and approved.

The Clerks of churches were earnestly requested to write their letters to the Association on "Church Letter Blanks," which can be procured at the *Recorder* office. By using these, full statistics can be given.

A letter was received from Conoconary, and Bro. E. P. Powell as delegate.

Also one from Zion, Brethren J. T. Brinkley and J. P. Savage delegates.

The latter church petitioned for the next Association. The following report on Obituaries was read.

MEMORIAL OF ELDER MARK BENNETT.

We learn from Elder L. B. Bennett, surviving brother of Elder Mark Bennett, that the subject of this memorial was born in December, 1798, three miles from Reedy Creek church in Warren County, N. C.; that his father moved into North Carolina when Mark was a small boy; that his opportunities of education were very limited; that he had not more than ten months schooling up to manhood.

At the age of twenty he was a clerk for some one in the town of Nashville, and having occupied the place only four months, he entered the Hilliardston Academy, of which Thos. G. Stone was Principal, where he remained ten months, studying English Grammar, Geography and Latin.

After this he had no professional teacher, but he had a "soul athirst for knowledge," and using diligently his limited means of gratifying that desire, he had acquired long before his death, an accurate and extensive knowledge of English, while his acquaintance with Greek and Latin, though not extensive was useful to him in searching the Scriptures, which was daily his delight. His information on important and entertaining subjects was so abundant and varied, and his method of imparting instruction so clear, convincing and agreeable, that they who enjoyed the pleasure of his conversation were ready to acknowledge themselves his debtors for some useful fact or some pleasant incident. Not uncommonly defective in quick-

ness of apprehension, he was yet more remarkable for a strong memory; for what a Scotch critic calls a "solid way of looking on matters;" for an invincible determination to penetrate the heart of any subject which came within reach of his powers, and was worthy of attention.

Brother Bennett was eminently a servant of Jesus Christ, and the whole of his ministerial life was an evident vindication of the belief that he was graciously separated unto the Gospel of God. His sermons were instructive and searching; and when he entered the pulpit no one failed to perceive that his heart was full of kindness and tender love for those whom he was about to address. We never knew a man who seemed to be more under the control of love for the Divine Master. He had seen His salvation and loved to be telling of it all the day long. His home was a house of knowledge—a sanctuary—sweet resting place for Zion's pilgrims, where, upon setting down to a meal, you felt as if you were about to partake of an ordinance where everything was sanctified by the word of God and prayer.

Physically he was a powerful man, and was subjected for several years to such suffering as would have destroyed very soon an ordinary constitution. It was in the school of uncommonly severe affliction that his *profiting* appeared most clearly unto all who had the privilege of seeing him there. His faith was purified as gold in the furnace. His patience lasted as long as his sufferings, and had, therefore, its perfect work.

Brother Bennett was married twice—first to the widowed mother of Hon. R. R. and Col. John Bridgers, of Edgecombe, and then to Miss Pope, of Halifax. In each of these excellent and godly women, he found a wise counselor to correct the mistakes of his own judgment, and a loving wife who threw the softening charm of her personal influence over the asperity of his natural disposition.

An interesting volume might be compiled from the unpublished letters, poems and other productions from Bro. Bennett's pen, and from the recollections of many persons now living; but your committee felt that they had no right to transgress the limits of simply a report.

It has been made public already that the venerable and beloved subject of his memorial died at "Transient Rest," his residence in Nash County, on the 5th day of August, 1875, in the 76th year of his age.

The Moderator, Elders Hufham and Brooks paid a high tribute to the memory of the late Elder Mark Bennett.

The time and place of the next Association was taken up. After a pleasant rivalry, Pleasant Grove, in Nash County,

was selected as the place, and Thursday before the 1st Sunday in October, 1877, as the time.

Elder M. R. Pinnell obtained leave of absence.

Elder J. S. Purefoy obtained the floor in behalf of Wake Forest College, and offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That it is with pleasure we learn of the present effort to raise \$100,000 for the endowment of Wake Forest College, and of the purpose to raise of this amount \$20,000 within the Tar River, Flat River, Beulah and Mt. Zion Associations for the Wait professorship in the College.

Resolved, That we recommend that the churches of this Association raise \$5,000 as our share of this professorship.

Resolved, That the following nine brethren be appointed a committee to council, aid and encourage the agent of the college in this work: John Watson, Dr. W. C. Lankford, J. J. Rodwell, W. H. Avera, E. P. Powell, Jas. L. Battle, G. W. Blount, J. T. Webb and Peter J. Dement.

Elder Purefoy then spoke of the trials and efforts of the friends of the College, what they had done, are doing and intend to do.

Resolutions lay on the table until the afternoon.

Bro. F. P. Hobgood, of the Raleigh Female Seminary, spoke of his school, laying its advantages before the members of the Association.

The Association arose to hear the Denominational Sermon by Elder Newell.

SATURDAY, 3 o'clock, P. M.

The Clerk was instructed to have 1,200 copies of the minutes printed, and to receive for his labor the usual compensation.

The Clerk reported all the old minutes transcribed in the Record Book.

Home Missions being called up, Elder Griffith proposed changing the title of this branch of Missions to "Associa-

tional" Missions, and gave a history of similar Missions in the western part of the State. Suggestion adopted.

The following report on Beneficiaries was read:

Dear Brethren: When you appointed this committee we believed that you intended we should do something. We are pained to inform you that notwithstanding we called the attention of the brethren to the fact that we should not be trammeled for want of funds, as there was a considerable balance remaining in the treasury of the Association, yet no church corresponded with us informing us of there being any young brother, evidently called of the Spirit to preach, and who needed our assistance; hence we did nothing. The action of the Treasurer in paying away the Beneficiary funds of the Association would have trammeled our operations if, in God's providence we had been called upon to support a Beneficiary. To prevent

a recurrence of this thing we recommend a definite and positive re-statement of the wishes of the Association in the matter. For the year to come we would recommend that this Association contribute to the support of Bro. T. R. Walker, a former Beneficiary of this body, and as the funds sent up to this session will be inadequate for his expenses, we would further recommend that on the return of the delegates a collection be taken at once in all our churches, and the funds sent to Rev. G. W. Newell, at Louisburg, N. C., to be used for the liquidation of his liabilities.

Report on State Missions was called for and Elder P. H. Pernell submitted the following:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Dear Brethren: We believe that the Missionary wrok is one that should claim the attention of every true Baptist. We also believe that it is our duty to contribute of our means to send the Gospel to the Heathen. But

let us first attend the wants of our own beloved State.

We are informed by the Croresponding Secretary of the State Mission Board that there are fifty destitute sections in North Carolina now calling for the Gospel; and shall we close our eyes to the calls of this people and keep them from the Bread of Life. The State Board at the commencement of this Conventional year was something over \$500 in debt. It has during this year curtailed its expenses, rather than go any further in debt, and we think it was wise that they did so. But if every Baptist in the State would only give the small amount of 10 cents per head we could occupy every destitute nook and corner in the State. The Board is now at work at Salisbury, Statesville, Morganton, Dallas, Gastonia, Polkton and Rockingham as centres. It also has one missionary in Tyrrell county. Churches have been organized at important points, and the labors of the missionaries greatly blessed; and now as God has so greatly blessed the labors of what few missionaries we have in the field, we would recommend that every delegate belonging to this Association, on returning to their respective churches, request that the above amount be raised, so that every son and daughter of North Carolina may have an opportunity of hearing the Gospel in its purity.

Report on Ministerial Education called for and read, as follows:

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Dear Brethren: It has been a question for some time, Shall we have an

educated Ministry? But this is not the question, for our ministers will be educated. Therefore the question is who shall educate them? Shall it be by their own unaided efforts, which will necessarily be labored, tedious and slow; or shall they have the aid of proficient instructors? Shall they be left to pick up a volume here and there, and at their spare moments, when not engaged in preaching, plowing or hoeing, and by their midnight lamp pore over its pages? Or shall they have the advantages afforded by our Colleges and Seminaries, where large and well selected libraries stand out invitingly and offer such rare opportunities to eager minds longing to grapple with the powers of learning? We answer, The proficient instructor and well selected library should be placed in the reach of every young minister, so that he may gather knowledge and be the better prepared to teach from God's sacred truth.

Now such opportunities are afforded at Wake Forest College, and also at the Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., where young brethren, and older ones also, may go, free of tuition charges, and be instructed in Theology. And this fact is calling loudly upon the brethren all through the land to aid in sending these brethren to these places that they may be the

better fitted to teach the truth.

It is true the heart must be right before Ged, and every one who preaches should be well assured of a divine call; for without this all else is a failure so far as preaching the Gospel acceptably is concerned; but with the assurance before us that a brother is divinely called to the ministry, be sure that education is attended to before setting him apart to regular work; then we shall feel the better for it—having the consciousness that all has been done that is required at our hands.

It is true again that many without the above advantages, have done and are still doing good and efficient work; and this has been employed as an argument against an educated ministry. But we think it an argument it its favor, because these very men, if they had been educated, would have been of vast more benefit to the church than they have been without an educa-

tion.

Therefore, brethren, let us see to it that we have an educated ministry, and especially see to it that, if they cannot have classical training, they at least shall have the benefit of a theological course.

The report was received and discussed at some length by Elder C. A. Jenkins, in his naturally pleasant style and eloquent language. He would say nothing to the disparagement of uneducated preachers; they have done and are still doing a great deal of good, and yet the greatest need of our denomination to-day is an educated ministry. Our people are becoming better educated and they require at the hands of the ministry a more efficient education than they have had in the past.

Bro. C. M. Cooke thought the churches sometimes make mistakes in recommending men to be educated by the Board and then hold the College responsible for the results; the Lord never calls a man to preach the Gospel who has not got common sense, nor can the College make a preacher

of a man who is not called of God to the ministry.

The report was adopted.

Dr. W. C. Lankford stated that Bro. T. R. Walker had informed him that he declined remaining at Wake Forest on account of ill health.

Elder G. W. Newell, as chairman of the Committee on Beneficiaries, stated that they had had no meeting since last Association.

A petition from Cedar Rock Church (recently organized) was read, asking admission into, and membership with, this Association, with letter, and as delegates W. D. Coppedge, O. D. Burnett and Jessie Fulghum.

Elders Jenkins, Duke and Mundy were appointed a committee to examine the Articles of Faith, &c., as set forth in

the Constitution adopted by this church.

Resolution is answer to Reedy Creek Church re-read and discussed by Bro. N. B. Broughton, suggesting a plan of system by appointing finance committees in each church, so that every member shall be seen and talked to personally with regard to his duty; such a system had been adopted in churches of his acquaintance, and had proved a success.

Bro. Daniel Wester said a question similar to this had been decided by this Association more than fifty years ago.

Resolution adopted.

Delegates from Sandy Creek and Hickory Chapel arrived. Bro. Broughton announced that he was present to take subscriptions for the *Recorder*, and spoke of the 50 cent plan.

The committee appointed to investigate the orthodoxy of

Cedar Rock Church submitted the following report:

We have examined the Declaration of Faith, the Articles of Faith and the Church Covenant as set forth in the Constitution adopted by the Cedar Rock Baptist Church, and have found them to be in accordance with the teaching of the Holy Scriptures. We cordially recommend, therefore, that the church be admitted into this Association.

The report was adopted and the right hand of fellowship extended, welcoming the church to membership with this Association.

FRIDAY, 2 O'clock, P. M.

Report on Periodicals called for. No report. On motion Bro. N. B. Broughton was invited to speak for

the Recorder, and in an earnest, forcible style (which is characteristic of the man), he set forth not only the claims of the Recorder upon the Baptist denomination in consideration of the vast amount of good it has been the instrument in accomplishing, but the fact that the Recorder furnishes as much valuable reading matter as can be obtained from any other source for the same amount of money.

Elder J. A. Mundy, Dr. W. C. Lankford, Bro. Daniel Wes-

ter and Bro. C. M. Cooke all spoke for the Recorder.

A letter from Wilson was received. Brethren Geo. W.

Blount and J. B. Brewer, delegates.

The report on Associational Missions was called for and read as follows:

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

Dear Brethren: There is much destitution of Baptist preaching within our bounds, and several important neighborhoods having no organized

body of baptized believers, or any regular preaching in their midst.

We should feel under obligations to send the Gospel everywhere that it is not, and there can be no excuse for neglect of the work that is nearest our own doors. Therefore, with a view of beginning at once to do what we can towards meeting the claims that are upon us-

Resolved, That this Association do now adopt some one point within its bounds as a Mission Station at which we will try to supply monthly preach-

ing during the ensuing year.
2. That Nashville be the point so adopted.

3. That the Moderator appoint a Committee of three brethren to secure, if possible the services of some brother to preach for them and report success to-morrow.

4. That the pastor so chosen shall receive as his compensation the funds sent up by the churches during the next year for Home Missions, and the amounts collected by nim on his field, provided these amounts do not exceed \$100.

The Association, however, shall not hereby be pledged for any greater

sum than the amounts so secured.

The report was received and discussed by Elders Pitchford and Fulford, and on motion lay on the table until tomorrow.

And when we reflect for a moment we are astonished that all are not heartily engaged in the work, both old and young; for I see no reason why there is not a Sabbath School in every community. It is scarcely necessary for me to speak of the advantages of a Sabbath School in every community—every one may see for himself if he will but pause and examine; and he will find that where the Sabbath was once desecrated it is now hallowed, where children were ignorant and disorderly now their minds are being enlightened, and their deportment orderly, and, more than all, we trust that in many instances where the heart was hard and callous, it has been softened and made susceptible to God's holy truth.

Much more could be said in this connection, but why multiply words upon a subject that experience will teach to every one who will go to work

earnestly.

Therefore, we would recommend that every church in the bounds of our Association, do all that is expedient to push forward the Sabbath School work.

The Moderator also appointed the following committee to nominate standing committees: J. D. Hufham, M. T. Duke and Burtis Cone.

Report on Foreign Missions was called. No report.

On motion of Rev. J. A. Pitchford, Elder Hufham was appointed to prepare a report. Motion adopted.

On motion of Rev. G. M. Duke, the Missionary's report

was read, as follows:

Brethren:—Your Missionary at Nashville begs leave to submit the following report, to-wit: During the past Associational year I have preached statedly in the field assigned, on the fourth Sunday in each month at 11 o'clock, and at night, unless providentially hindered by sickness or bad weather.

I found the field in a wasted and deplorable condition, so much so that

it was with many misgivings that I entered upon the task assigned.

There is but one house of worship in the place, and that a Methodist one, at which they have preaching once a month. I occupied the Court House, and while I received a cordial and hearty reception, yet I found a great lack in desire to hear the gospel. It seemed the people were given up to other pursuits so much, and there had been so little gospel preaching in their midst, they had lost all interest in sacred things. But, with the blessings of God, a strong, attentive and appreciative congregation has been built up, and the prospect is more hopeful in the future than it has been in the past.

I found in Nashville only six Baptists, three brethren and three sisters, but the popular sentiment is baptistic, and the prospect now is, that after the Association there will be a meeting of several day's duration, and we

hope the harvest will be ripe for the gathering.

It has been our purpose to constitute a church in Nashville, but it has been delayed for good reasons, not necessary to be incorporated in this report; but the trouble being about removed, we look forward to the consummation of our desires. Also the building of a house of worship is under consideration, but I am sorry to say but little has been done in this direction, but still we are hopeful, and believe that by the exercise of a little patience, and a great deal of perseverance and self-denial, the work will be accomplished.

We have raised on the field for this year's services, the sum of \$25.00 in cash and pledges. This people will again appreciate the notice of the As-

sociation and welcome its servant to their midst.

Dear brethren, do let the work go on at Nashville, and whoever you may deem proper to put in the mission field, let Nashville be incorporated therein.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

This department of our labor derives its authority and its importance from our Saviour's last command: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." So long as there is one creature in all the earth to whom the gospel has not been sent, so long must every lover of Jesus be a missionary in faith and in practice. How much more should we be stirred up to diligence in this matter, when there are so many millions—millions on millions of immortal beings who have not so much as heard the name of Jesus!

The results of the work thus far have been such as to give ample encouragement to go forward. Men now living remember the going out of Judson, Rice and Newell, the first missionaries of the American Baptists to the heathen. In the field occupied by them the native christians are now numbered by thousands. During one month of this year more than five thousand converts from heathenism were baptized in that field alone. Results equally remarkable have been witnessed in other parts of the earth.

From Bro. Yates, and our other brethren in China, there come words of cheer. The indications have never been so cheering, so far as the openings for labor and the interest of the people in the preached word are concerned. But the laborers are few; they are falling at their posts. They are calling for reinforcements, but the lack of funds prevents these reinforcements from being sent on.

In Rome we have succeeded at last in securing a house of worship which will be ready for use in a few months. There, and throughout Italy, our missionaries are meeting with abundant one programment.

missionaries are meeting with abundant encouragement.

In Africa, also, the favor of the Lord seems to rest on the efforts which His people are putting forth.

Let us more and more labor and pray and give for the turning of the

heathen nations to Christ.

Hufham in his own happy and peculiarly interesting and instructive way, enlightened and delighted the audience with the proven history of the Baptists in past ages, and their great success in foreign lands, and urged the necessity as well as duty of giving liberally of our means to extend the Kingdom of Christ among the heathen.

Dr. Wingate, in an elaborate and exceedingly interesting speech, spoke of the success attending the labors of our

Missionaries in foreign lands.

Bro. Broughton, in his earnest and pleasing way, thinks we ought to pray more for the success of foreign missions;

if we would pray more we would give more.

Bro. Purefoy thinks enough has been said, but cannot refrain from saying a word on the subject, and proves conclusively that we are sending out Missionaries just as in the days of the Apostle Paul. To go into all the world, is a command binding upon all, and to go with our purses, if not our persons, is a duty binding upon every christian.

The report was ably discussed by Brethren Fulford, Hufham, Powell, Pitchford and Wester, when the question was called and the report adopted.

MEMORIAL OF ELDER WILCOX.

Thomas Wilcox was born in the county of Halifax, N. C., on the second of March, 1804; was baptized in 1828, was ordained in 1830, and died at home, in his native county, on the 8th of March, 1877. He was an intelligent, industrious and successful farmer. His Divine Master, when He called him to the ministry, found Bro. Wilcox where Elijah did Elisha—at the plow. He represented that class of men who are generally the best made, because they are self-made. He was far from being illiterate. On the contrary, he had acquired a good English education, and had enriched his mind with valuable stores of practical knowledge. Although he came not with excellency of speech or of wisdom, yet he was earnest and faithful, declaring unto you the testimony of God. His fire-side conversations and his discourses in the pulpit, seemed always to flow from a heart full of love to Christ, and of loving concern for all whom he addressed. He was with you in weakness and in fear, and in much trembling; for he determined not to know anything among you, save Jesus Christ and Him crucified.

Although rooted and built up in Christ, and established in the faith, his mind was subject to remarkable variations, rising sometimes to the height of full assurance, and at other times sinking down to the lowest depths of despondency. This distressing reflux of feeling, which at times he experienced, was due to the habitual tenderness of conscience for which he was noted, and ultimately to that sense of unworthiness—that low estimate of himself—which was the brightest jewel in his character—which made him the useful servant of the Lord that he was, and rendered him so lovely in

the eyes of all others, though sincerely degraded in his own.

His domestic circle, made attractive and charming by its individual members, revolved around him as the centre of its life, influence and happiness. A hearty welcome, generous hospitality, and (at parting) unfeigned regret, made every visitor feel and express himself with Bunyan's pilgrim: "Methought those things did ravish my heart I would have stayed at that good man's house a twelve month, but that I knew I had farther to go."

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

Report on Sunday Schools was read by Elder Vann, as

follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We beg leave to submit the following facts, assuming the data furn-

ished in the Associational Letters as a basis:

Number of schools in Association, 34; number of officers and teachers, 257; average attendance, 188, or about three-fourths; number of pupils, 1,923; average attendance, 1,250, or about two-thirds. Number of months teaching, 250, averaging per school, 7½. Contributions to all objects, \$285.96. Number of conversions, 60. Churches reported with schools, 26; churches reported without schools, 3; churches unreported, 6.

As compared with last year's statistics, the report shows a gain of 5 schools, 6 teachers, 73 scholars, 40 months of teaching, and \$118.32 in contributions. There has been a loss of 95 in conversions. The average attendance is about the same. Of the churches reported last year 8 were

without schools; only 3 are reported so now.

Assuming the data furnished by the State Sunday School Board as a basis, we find in the Tar River Association about 4,000 Baptists, of whom only 450 are in the Sunday School work.

We believe that the agency ordained to abolish the anti-mission spirit

is the Sunday School. Youthful prejudice yields readily, and youthful intellect absorbs rapidly, while youthful errors are most easily corrected. It is the duty of every Christian to seek a work and to do it. The field most accessible to all laborers, the school best adapted to all classes, is the Sunday School work.

Remarks by Elders Vann and Carrick.

Prof. Taylor: Some people think this is a sentimental work for women and children. If children are properly trained, and religious instruction given, it is the best and cheapest way of emptying penitentiaries and jails. It increases the value of lands and property. Expel ministers from the country for forty years, and no decent person would live in it. Do not raise the standard of teaching too high—take the Bible for your guide, and however poor your abilities, do the best you can.

Dr. O. D. Coppedge delivered a spirited address on the work, and told how it was done in Texas; and how that distant State and its society had been improved by Sunday

Schools.

Elder Hufham: There are those who think because one is a Missionary Baptist he is sent by man, and not by God. We stand on the New Testament as our platform and guide book, and we teach that in the Sabbath School. He told how Scotland Neck and Enfield had been improved by Sabbath School work.

Elder J. S. Purefoy: The Sunday School abolished idolatry. Synagogues were Sunday Schools. The greatest difficulty is, we do not appreciate the work.

The report was adopted.

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

It has been the aim of your Committee to select and recommend for the consideration of this body such reading matter as shall best present and defend the distinctive doctrines of the Baptist churches, as shall speak to our people most faithfully the words of eternal life, and as shall bring most effectually sunshine and gladness into our homes.

In our opinion the Biblical Recorder is best calculated to meet the demands and needs of the Baptists of the Tar River Association, and for

the following reasons:

1st. Knowledge is making rapid strides in our State. The daily newspapers are instructing the people. Cheap and hurtful literature abounds and finds many readers easily attracted by its tinsil. The cry comes up from every section of our country for something to read. What shall the people read? Shall they feed their minds on error, and form their opinions from the wild and reckless creeds contained in many of the periodicals they may chance to find around them? God forbid! But let us, by every means in our power, endeavor to impress the Baptists of this

Association with the importance of encouraging and sustaining the Biblical Recorder, as the most, faithful exponent of their principles, and

as the tircless guardian of their homes.

2nd. Baptists should take the *Recorder* because it teaches them their aty. Without some such medium of communication our members would know but little of Home or Foreign Missions. Upon these, and kindred points, it is the great instructor, and the careful observer will discover that where no paper enforcing the claims of missions is taken, the people care but little for the spread of the gospel, and utterly disregard every call of benevolence.

3rd. By reading the Recorder we are brought into sympathy with all the objects of the Convention, and thus become more intelligent, useful and active Christians. It is also a bond of union between the brethren of the State, bringing them into nearer and dearer relations with each

other.

4th. The Biblical Recorder is the untiring advocate of education. Its great heart beats in unison with that of our beloved College, everywhere

presenting its claims and urging its necessity.

5th. The Recorder cannot be too highly prized as a fireside preacher. It speaks to the soul; it enters the recesses of the heart. Many a pious man has lamented the embarrassment by which he is surrounded when he attempts to speak on eternal things with the unregenerate ones of his family; some have said it is easier to speak to strangers than to loved ones of religion. A good religious journal, then, meets a want here that nothing else can, for its tongue is never silent.

We recommend also, as worthy of your consideration, the Foreign Mission Journal, Richmond, Va., and Kind Words, an excellent Sunday School paper published at Macon, Georgia.

Remarks by Dr. T. J. Pitchford: We should carry our Recorders to church to be read by those who cannot subscribe.

Elder J. S. Purefoy: There were 40,000 Baptists in the State in 1835; there are 160,000 to-day. One grand agency in this increase is the Baptist State Convention; another is Wake Forest College; the third is the Biblical Recorder, which has been at work as a pillar, building up the denomination. Its teachings cannot be dispensed with.

Elder Daniel Wester: There are three ways of winning men: by persuasion, force and shame. The Association should be ashamed of itself and of himself, on account of the want of education. The Recorder was an educator.

Dr. Pitchford contrasted Lord Byron, with all his perverted talents, with George Peabody. What might have been Byron's reward if he had received early religious instruction? Bunyan, the poor Baptist tinker, while in prison, wrote Pilgrim's Progress, a work that has carried light to millions of souls. He commented on the parable of the talents; the Recorder can be to all of us as one talent, which we can improve.

Dr. T. H. Pritchard represented the Recorder in an able speech.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Prayer by Elder Gwaltney. Report on Periodicals adopted.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

The Minister of the Gospel fills a very responsible place, being a messenger of God and having to preach that which will be a savor of life unto lie, or of death unto death—how necessary it is that he should be thoroughly instructed in his work! We believe it to be the duty of the minister to prepare himself to the extent of his ability to preach. While God blesses very weak and feeble instruments for good, and to the conversion of souls, this does not relieve the minister of his obligation to prepare for his work. God does not call men to idleness, but to work. The command to preach includes the command to study; "study to show thyself an approved workman," is the language of Paul to Timothy. Through the generosity of the friends of education, a place has been prepared (Wake Forest College) where ministers may be educated in a great deal less time than they could be at home. But there are brethren among us who are not able to educate themselves. Shall we help them? Our ill success in the past should not deter us from helping in the future.

We would suggest that a fund be raised as soon as convenient, and placed in the hands of a committee appointed by this body, to be loaned to worthy brethren who are called to preach and need help, instead of given to them as formerly. We think this the better plan, because it will secure us against loss, and be a positive advantage to the borrower in that it will relieve him of that sense of dependence that he must feel when a beneficiary, and must make him labor harder to educate himself. Again, only men who are determined to be educated will take advantage of this offer. We do not wish anything herein stated to have reference to the work of the State Board of Education, but simply to our own work.

There are fourteen brethren now at College who need assistance, and we hope the brethren will not ignore this department of Christian labor, but will help to the extent of our ability, and not suffer our Associational work to absorb other interests entirely.

Elder Duke made a stirring speech on this subject.

Prof. C. E. Taylor followed, explaining the object and manner of educating young ministers at Wake Forest College. He stated that twenty-two ministers were present (at this Association) and a large majority of them were raised outside of the Association, showing that we should educate

young ministers, let them come from whatever section they may. If we do not afterward get the services of those we educate, we may receive the labors of those whom others have educated.

Elder Vann thought that if Wake Forest College was blotted out, our denomination would go backward one hundred years. A minister must be educated before he can effectually preach—either self educated or educated by schools and colleges. The self-educated minister spends the best portion of his life before he is prepared. There have been, according to statistics, fewer ministerial failures from Wake Forest College than from any school in the United States.

Dr. Thomas E. Skinner thought that the students at Wake Forest College might discuss which was the more important, Wake Forest College or the *Biblical Recorder*. Education was the foundation stone on which an elegant building might be erected. M. T. Yates went to College at twenty-one years of age, to get an education. Now, in point of

learning, he stands second to no man.

It was moved that the Presbytery to ordain brother R. D. Harper be re-called, as the petition did not come from brother Harper's church. Motion carried.

REPORTS ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

Mission work in the bounds of our Association has brought to light an array of facts we, as Christians, eannot disregard. The territory opened to our missionaries is wide and inviting, and should we be slow to go in to possess it, we shall let slip one of the most prolific opportunities ever

presented to a body of Christian workers.

The destitution within our borders should make heavy drafts upon our sympathies, since it lies so near our doors. It appeals to the noblest sentiments that ever moved men to action. Our own fellow eitizens, in whose veins some of your blood flows, are opening their hearts gladly to the gospel, as we believe and preach it. The labor of our missionaries is no experiment over a doubtful problem, but an energetic effort toward a development of known facts. The people calling upon our liberalities are not strangers, but our kindred. To be heedless to that call would violate the most noble instincts of humanity. By a generous liberality we must prove ourselves worthy of the superior spiritual advantages a kind Providence has conferred upon us.

We leave it with the missionaries to state the condition of their respective fields. They have but to relate the things they have seen and heard, to awaken generous liberality in every breast. For the amount contributed by the churches, a most encouraging work has been accomplished. The results flowing from such a small expenditure of money

should inspire us to make large investments in this direction.

Jordan at Lauringburg, Shoe-Heel and Rockingham; brother Stough at Lincolnton; and a few others have labored in equally inviting fields, and your committee does not remember a year in which the Lord has poured out larger blessings upon the missionaries of the Convention.

It has been the constant effort of the Board of Missions to induce Associations to co-operate in this great work, and we are gratified to state that a number of these laborers have been supported by the joint contributions

of the district Associations and the State Board.

It is our duty to state, in conclusion, that the State Board is considerably in debt to his employees, and that it will be obliged to report a deficit to the Convention unless contributions to this object increase during the next few weeks. The record of the State Mission Board is a noble one, and its claims should by no means be neglected.

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PROCEEDINGS.

PEACH TREE BAPTIST CHURCH, NASH COUNTY, N. C., October 7th, 1880.

The Tar River Baptist Association convened with this

church to-day in its semi-centennial session.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder R. T. Vann, in the absence of Elder Thomas Carrick, from Rev. 7th ch. parts of 14th and 15th verses: "These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. The report on State Missions (see Appendix A) was read by Elder P. H. Pernell, and discussed by Bro. Broughton, who stated that the State Board had expended \$325 within the bounds of our Association, and that the Board was in debt. The report was adopted.

Elder J. A. Mundy read the report on Ministerial Education, which was made the special order for to-morrow at 10

o'clock a. m. (See Appendix B.)

The report on Periodicals was read by Elder Vann. (See Appendix C.) Bro. Broughton stated that the BIBLICAL RECORDER was more extensively circulated now than ever before. The publishers and editors were laboring to make it acceptable to all. He thought Bro. Bailey wast he hardest worked man in the denomination. The RECORDER is as large as any paper in the State, and has the largest circulation.

Bro. Purefoy always felt at home, and met with intelligence and success, in families that were visited by the RECORDER. He thought \$2.00 invested in that would result in more good to a family of children than \$10 or \$12 in schools. The report was further discussed by Brethren Cooke, Willcox, Avera and Wester, and then adopted.

Bro. W. H. Avera from the Eastern Association, and Prof. C. E. Taylor from Wake Forest College, were invited

to seats.

Bro, Goodman Lewis, from New Hope, was excused from further attendance.

The report on Associational Missions (Appendix D.) was read by Elder Hufham. Reports from those who had labored in this field were made by Elders Vann, Carter, Duke,

Pitchford, Knight and Wilcox.

Elder Carter rejoiced to get back home among North Carolina Baptists. This would soon be the banner State of the South in Missions. He had been laboring for years in the rich blue-grass region of Kentucky, where the population was nearly all Baptist, but the long-leaf pine, tar-heel Baptists of North Carolina gave twice as much for Missions. He came back here to work, and prayed God to prosper our efforts.

Elder Pitchford had been published as a slanderer and a liar for making a truthful assertion about a portion of his mission field, but the truth of God's word was now carrying light into this region. He did not pray for dying grace, but for living and working grace, He made it the rule of his life to speak a word about God to every stranger with whom he converses, if it is only for five minutes. His work was encouraging.

Elder Duke was laboring with success at Nashville and

Battleboro.

Elder Knight was at Plymouth, Hamilton, Pine Forest and Jamesville. He was the last Baptist preacher this side of Liverpool, going east; his field was a large one, but he wanted to work as long as he lived—and if he did not work he ought not to live.

The following report on Foreign Missions was read:

The great commission under which Baptists work is that given by the Great Head of the churches to His disciples, to go, therefore, in foreign lands and there proclaim Jesus, is of as binding force as it is to preach at home. To contribute of our means to that end is equally obligatory. Feeling the weight and force of that obligation, our organized bodies—Associations and Conventions—put down in the same category Home and Foreign Missions as objects for which to labor.

We have Boards established to attend to the proper management of

the funds raised for each field.

We acquaint ourselves too little with the workings of the Foreign Mission Board. We know too little of the work of those consecrated men who have gone forth in heathen lands to work for the cause of Christ; we think too little of the great work they have in hand; we contribute too little of our means to the furtherance of that work. We see little of the fruits of those labors. We hope to learn more, and we invite discussion of these matters from those who do know, in the hope that a larger interest may be manifested by those who profess to be Missionary Baptists.

SUNDAY MORNING.

A vast audience assembled to witness the Semi-Centennial Exercises.

The Moderator read a brief history of the Association from its organization to the present time, commenting thereon.

Elder Daniel Wester gave entertaining reminiscences of his connection with the Association from its beginning in

1831.

The Clerk read a letter from the late Dr. James B. Taylor to his wife, written in 1831, from Peach Tree church. He spoke of Worrel, Crocker, Willcox and Waitt,—pilgrims who have gone before. Dr. Pitchford, Elder Wester, and a few others only, stand like lone sentinels upon the out-post, awaiting the command of the great Captain of their Salvation to retire. The great army of Baptists of their day, have fallen upon a field of glory! They but wait to join the chorus of their former comrades on the other side!

These brethren spoke of the past of our Association.

Elder Jos. E. Carter spoke for thirty minutes in his electrifying manner, of our present and future. If it was not wrong for the Apostle Paul to "boast" of the liberality of the Corinthians, he would boast of the great zeal and liberality of the ministers and laity of the Tar River Association. God is offering them great opportunities. More churches have been constituted in our bounds in the last eighteen months than Paul ever heard of. Looking to God, great things may be expected in the future.

Elder J. S. Purefoy had a three minutes speech, and Bro. N. B. Broughton closed in a short address. When he can forget that he is the representative of the RECORDER long enough to make a speech, his soul bursts out in such pathos as rarely fails to melt his audience to tears.

A contribution amounting to \$10.11 for Education Board

was taken.

Your committee discovers a growing interest on the part of the churches Your committee discovers a growing interest on the part of the churches of this Association in the education of those who give evidence of a Divine call to preach the gospel They are rapidly learning that our Colleges and Theological schools do not propose to manufacture preachers, or in any way impart that internal spiritual fitness which it is the province of the Holy Spirit to impart The prejudices growing out of a misconception of the task undertaken and scrupulously discharged by our institutions of learning are giving away in proportion to the acquaintance of our people with the power of truth upon the lips of those whose hearts are consecrated by the Spirit, and whose heads have been made clear and strong by a well ordered discipline. Fanaticism and formalism in religion may lose their facinations under the scrutiny of a trained ism in religion may lose their facinations under the scrutiny of a trained eye, but the true principles of Christianity which emanated from wisdom, fears only the abusive handlings of ignorance.

The duty of the minister of Jesus Christ is to teach the things commit-

ted to him in the sacred Scriptures. He is pre-eminently a teacher who comes before the people, as Peter went before Cornelius, to tell them words whereby they shall be saved. In preparing himself for this responsible duty, he will do well to heed the admonition of Paul to his son Timothy: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

And since that truth has come down to us through the medium of written languages, the preacher has to study these languages to render a proper division of truth. This impression is becoming more general, as may be learned from the popularity and influence of those men who have fully equipped themselves for their work, either in the school room

or in their private studies

Your committee would also report an increased number of ministerial students at Wake Forest College, and these "above the average in promise of usefulness," as reported to your committee by one who is in a position to know, and who never speaks unadvisedly either with his lips or his pen. This increase in the number of young preachers should stir both our gratitude and liberality. The churches of this Association should set apart special seasons of thanksgiving to God for calling these promising young men into the ministry, and for a liberal offering to the Education Board under whose auspices they are being prepared for their future work. These noble men, who constitute the Board by the appointment of our State Convention, are watching with the deepest solicitude for solid manifestations of our interest in a work which so much commends itself to the consideration of thinking people. They have faith in the wisdom and liberality of their brethren, and have said to those aspiring, devoted young men, "take courage and acquit you like men, the Lord, through the Baptists of North Carolina, will provide for you."

During the year your Executive Committee has aided in sustaining

eight missionaries.

Elder A. G. Willcox has been preaching once a month at Harriss' Chapel, Halifax county. Arrangements have been perfected for building a house of worship, and several are awaiting the ordinance of baptism.

At Aurelian Springs. Elder J. A. Pitchford has been preaching once a month. A church of fourteen members has been organized, and the brethren at that point are endeavoring to build a house of worship.

Elder R. T. Vann has been preaching once a month at Weldon, Halifax and Enfield. At Weldon four persons have been baptized. At two

of these points the indications are sufficiently encouraging.

Elder W. B Knight has been preaching once a month at Hamilton, Jamesville, and Pine Forest. At the first named of these places, a beautiful and comfortable house of worship has been erected, and one person has been baptized.

Elder C. L. Powell has been devoting most of his time to Pantego, Beaufort county, and the surrounding country. We have encouraging

accounts from him, though he reports no baptisms.

Elder J. E. Carter has been laboring once a month at Rocky Mount At the former place a church of twelve members has been organized, and arrangements are being made to build a house of worship. At Tarboro the house of worship, which had become dilapidated, has been thoroughly repaired, and the prospects have brightened everyway.

At Washington the cause had suffered greatly. Under Elder Carrick

the house has received some sadly needed repairs, and the little flock is

now very hopeful.

Elder G. M. Duke has been preaching once a month at Nashville and He reports encouragement at both places, though he is

greatly hindered in his work by the want of houses of worship.

This brief enumeration of the laborers in the home field, and this abstract of the results of their work, are sufficiently gratifying and encouraging, but they exhibit only a tithe of what has been done. We have

only cleared the ground for future action.

Meanwhile we are called on to go forward in the blessed work. New fields are opening before us, and calling us to enter them. There should be a considerable increase in the amount of funds raised for next year. Certainly there should be no falling off in this matter.





APPENDIX A.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

All that love the Lord and desire the happiness of man, should desire the gospel to be preached in every part of the State. If this is true of christians generally, how much more is it true of Baptists? Baptists hold many truths in common with other christians, they hold some important doctrines of the Bible alone, doctrines that affect the civil and religious well being of our fellow creatures. The Baptists have all been the friends of civil and religious liberty; they have a purer form of church government; they hold and practice the ordinances as delivered by the Saviour; they have ever been opposed to the union of church and State; they acknowledge no lawgiver but Christ, no rule of faith, doctrine and practice but the Scriptures.

While we rejoice in the good done by others, and co-operate with our sister denominations in all things that we can conscientiously, yet we think the Baptists should desire Baptist preaching in every part of the And all should be willing to contribute of our means to assist in building Baptist churches in every part of the State. We think the Baptists have a special mission in the world. Inasmuch as we hold the truth pure, we should give it to others. It is for these reasons that we are trying to build churches in towns and other places where other denominations already have churches. We hope the masses of our people will see it in this light, and become thoroughly identified with and interested in the mission movement of the State.

Again, there are many places in the Stat where there are a few Baptists that are not able to support a preacher; it is but right that those that are stronger should be willing to assist the weaker brethren. In the Tar River Association we are doing a good work, which is properly State mission work, yet we should not limit our contributions to our Association alone, but should do our utmost for the whole State. We have abundant reasons to be grateful to God for the blessing he has

given to our State work this year.

The reports from every section of the State indicate progress; there has been a general advance all over the State among the Baptists; new houses are being built, and new churches organized all over the State. These things call for greater activity on our part. These things ought to encourage us to press forward and attempt still greater things for the Master, and the success that has attended our efforts, should confirm us in the belief that the work has the Divine approval. Some of our people imagine the State Board of Missions to be salaried officers, and for this reason will not give to this work. We have simply this to say, that these are good men who do not receive any pay, but give of their time and money for this work. We do not write this because you need information here, but we hope to reach some of our people through the minutes in which these reports are usually published.

We, your committee, would recommend that the pastors endeavor to inform their people, and take up collections to assist in paying some indebtedness of the Board, and that they organize systematic plans of

benevolence for this and all other objects of benevolence.

APPENDIX D

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We, as Baptists, attach too little importance to this grand work which God has instituted for the advancement of His kingdom on earth, and for the preparing of our boys and girls to fill more worthily the places which are daily being vacated by those who are called to cross over the river. The Sunday School presents a field in which every Christian, both old and young can find work, and pleasant work at that, to do.

The following are some facts which are gathered from the last year's Minutes of this Association: Number of Sunday Schools in the Association:

ation, 38; number of officers and teachers, 220; number of scholars, 2,210; number of months of teaching, 261; average time school kept open, 9½; number conversions in school, 31; churches without schools

13; not reported, 2.

As compared with the statistics of the previous year the report shows a gain of 6 schools and 619 scholars, and a loss of 9 teachers and 3 mouths

of teaching.

There has been also a loss of 43 in the number of conversions. We find that there are 4,478 Baptists in this Association, of whom only about about one-ninth are at work in Sunday Schools. Of the 319 baptisms in the Association, the Sunday Schools furnished nearly one-sixth.

Pastors should see that the Sunday Schools are properly officered and managed. The Sunday School work is a church work, and should be done by the members. They may sow the seed and leave it to the min-

isters to reap the harvest.

The first element of true success in the Sunday School work is the power of God's word; second, regular and liberal contributions. This is mission work and practical christianity; third, the conversion of souls—the final object of all Sunday School effort. Our motto should be a Sunday School in every Baptist church and in every neighborhood in To accomplish this I would suggest that this body appoint some active, zealous brother who will take an interest in Sunday School work, in each section of our Association, whose duty it shall be to visit each church in his section during the year, to urge the importance of Sunday Schools, and to organize one in every church where he finds none, and to organize schools, as far as he can, in every community not convenient to a church. These brethren to report the result of their labor at the next meeting of this body. Let this be a gratuitous mission. I earnestly hope this suggestion will be put into active operation by

APPENDIX E.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The subject of temperance, by which is meant the abstinence from intoxicating drink, is one which will claim the attention and solicit the interest of good men and christian people so long as the natural appetites exist and the use of such drinks can be indulged.

Our churches can not be faithful to their trusts and allow intemperance among their membership. While we believe an erring brother should be kindly and patiently dealt with, and then proper efforts made to reclaim him from the improper use of strong drink, we feel assured that in some cases the cause of Christ is made to suffer by-holding those in church fellowship who are addicted to intemperance.

This is a question which requires prudence, wisdom and christian moderation to manage, and in all instances these should be sought by those upon whom the responsibility falls.

RULES OF DECORUM.

Believing it to be our indispensable duty to enter into certain rules and regulations in conducting the business of this Association, we adopt the following, viz:

1st. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2nd. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator by the appellation of brother.

3d. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted until he is done, unless he breaks the rules of this decorum.

4th. The person speaking shall strictly adhere to the subject, and in

no wise reflect on the person who spoke before, but shall fairly state the case so as to convey his ideas.

5th. No brother shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the

Association without obtaining liberty.

6th. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, with-

out obtaining liberty from the Association.

7th. No person shall be at liberty to whisper in the time that a brother

7th. No person shall be at liberty to whisper in the time that a brother is making a speech.

8th. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member, or prohibit his speaking, until he gives ideas on the subject, unless he violates the rules of this decorum.

9th. The names of the several members shall be enrolled by clerk, and called over as often as the Association requires.

10th. The Moderator may be entitled to give his ideas on any subject before putting it to vote, but not entitled to a vote only in case of a tie.

before putting it to vote, but not entitled to a vote only in case of a tie.

11th. Any member who shall knowingly break any of these rules, shall be reproved by the body as they may think proper.

CONSTITUTION.

1st. The Association shall be composed of the pastors, and of the members chosen by the different churches in our union, who shall be members whom they deem best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to a seat.

2nd. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, ex-

communicated and dead since the last Association,

3rd. Members thus chosen and convened, shall be denominated the Tar River Baptist Association, who shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any ecclesiastical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any of the churches of this union.

4th. The Association, when convened, shall have a Moderator and a Clerk, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

5th. Other churches may be admitted into this union, who shall petition by letter and by delegates, and upon examination, if found orthodox or orderly, shall be received by the Moderator, giving the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

6th. Any church in this union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association, but shall not send more than three members from each

church.

7th. Every motion made and seconded shall be left to the discretion

of the Association whether it shall be debated or not.

8th. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes. The best method for effecting this purpose shall be left to the

discretion of the same.

9th. We think it absolutely necessary to have an associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For raising and supporting the same sum, we think it the duty of each church in this union to contribute voluntarily such sums as they may think proper, and send it by the hands of their delegates to the Association, who shall be accountable to the same for all money received and paid according to the direction of the Association.

10th. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association

rises.

11th. The Association shall have power to enquire into the cause why the churches do not, at any time of its sittings, represent themselves.

12th. The Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in this union, which may violate the rules of the same, or deviate from

the orthodox principles of religion.

13th. The Association shall have power to invite all visiting brethren in the ministry from other churches or Associations, who they esteem of good moral character, and of the same faith and order, to sit with her in council.

14th. This Association shall not have power to exercise any authority over the private sentiments of individual brethren or churches, respecting the various institutions of the day, proposing to have for their object the spreading of the gospel, and the diffusion of useful knowledge.

15th. The Association shall have power to adjourn to any future time

or place they may think most convenient to the churches.

16th. This Constitution shall be subject to alteration when a majority of this Association think proper.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Opened with prayer by Bro. Duke.

The special hour for the consideration of Associational Missions having arrived, Bro. Hufham, for chairman, read the report of missionaries laboring within our bounds.

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

There have been thirteen missionaries in the field during the year.

Elder J. H. Freeman has labored once a month at Fishing Creek where he has baptized thirteen persons and six have been received by letter into the fellowship of the church. He reports the prospects at that place to be of a most pleasing character.

Elder A. G. Willcox has been preaching once a month at Quankey in Halifax county. He has baptized twenty souls. A house of worship has been built and paid for, the cost being \$400. He has also been preaching once a month at Turkey Branch, Halifax county. At this place he has baptized eight persons and the lumber has been put on the ground to build a meeting house.

Elder Geo. Coppedge has preached once a month in the afternoon at the poor-house of Nash county, and once a month at a place on the Raleigh and Tarboro road. At this latter point he has held a meeting resulting in the con-

version of eighteen souls.

Elder M. V. McDuffie has been preaching once a month at Middleburg on the Raleigh and Gaston Railroad. He has organized a church of twelve members and baptized four persons. A house of worship has been erected, and though still unfinished the work has been paid for as far as it has gone. There is an efficient Sabbath School in successful operation.

Elder G. M. Duke has preached once a month at Battleboro, where he has organized a church of seven members. One has been baptized and three have been received by letter. Others are ready to be received into the fellowship of the church.

Elder Harper has preached once a month at Free Chapel and has baptized

four persons.

Elder Thos, Carrick has been preaching once a month at Washington. He

reports that the prospects are encouraging in that field and there is need for a settled pastor who shall give all his time to the work in that place. He has also preached once a month at Pactolus in Pitt county. At this place a good house of worship is in process of erection.

Elder F. R. Underwood has been laboring in Martin county and has been

greatly blessed in portions of his field. Seventeen have been baptized.

Elder W. P. Blake has been laboring at Weldon and Halifax. At the former place the church has been growing steadily in efficiency and spiritual power

and some have been baptized.

Elder J. E. Carter labored at Toisnot for several months. Since his removal to the western part of the State, Elder W. T. Jones has been preaching once a month at that place. The brethren are greatly cumbered by the work of building a house of worship.

Elder R. E. Peele has been laboring at Pantego and other points in Beaufort county. At Pantego he is getting ready to build a house of worship. Bro.

Peele is the only Baptist minister living in the county.

Elder Jas. A. Pitchford has been preaching at Aurelian Springs. He reports

no special encouragement in that field.

These reports of the brethren as given above should fill our hearts with gladness. The field is very extensive and requires much greater efforts than have yet been put forth for its extension.

APPENDIX A.

While we rejoice to know that at present the Baptists of North Carolina have a religious organ, the editorial management of which is not to be surpassed by any paper of like character North or South, and while the present large list of subscribers bespeak its merits and extent of appreciation among the Baptists of the State, yet it is to be deeply regretted that so many of our brethren and sisters never see the BIBLICAL RECORDER, and are thus deprived of the very best, if not the only means by which they can possibly become acquainted with the institutions and operations of the religious denomination which they represent. It should be a fixed purpose in the mind of every pastor and missionary in the State to see that the BIBLICAL RECORDER is taken and read in every family professing to represent the interests of the Baptist denomination in this State, for without it there must forever be among the masses a deficiency in the co-operative work of the denomination. Besides this, the weekly visits of the BIBLICAL RECORDER cost but two dollars per year, while we conceive it to be of incalculable value as an educator and an expounder of the Word of God to thousands who regularly peruse its columns and would be to thousands more were they to avail themselves, as they should, of the same privilege and bless-Your committee would also recommend to the churches and Sabbath schools of this Association KIND WORDS, a small paper admirably adapted to the Sunday school work, and which is now offered to clubs and schools upon such terms as it seems would make it available to all that may desire it. APPENDIX B.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

That the Sunday School work is an object of Christian effort which is of the highest importance is very generally admitted. The past few years show that increased interest is being taken in this work: and the Baptist State Sunday School Convention, organized only a year or two ago, gives promise of fostering and deepening this growing interest. It is to be regretted that there is yet in many places among us a want of that earnest persevering interest in the Sunday School to which the subject is entitled. How may this be remedied is a question presented for our consideration. We know that some one energetic brother in each church having the love of the work and of the children, and a determined purpose to make the school successful and prosperous would almost certainly assure its vitality and usefulness. How may these brethren be drawn out? It is altogether impracticable that the pastor of several scattered churches should be regularly in charge of the schools at any one of them; but his influence in behalf of Sunday Schools should be earnest and outspoken. He can and

should seek out and find the brethren in each congregation having special fitness for this work and should labor to convince them and their churches of their duty and of the importance of its proper and faithful discharge. Should pastors fail to do this, or fail of success in their efforts, another plan is suggested: It was recommended in the report on this subject to your session last year that this body appoint a Sunday School Missionary to devote his time specially to the work. The proper time in our history for taking this step may not have arrived, but many among us are convinced that it will have to be taken before the Sunday School becomes general in every neighborhood, and proves to be in every community as it is now found to be in many—a nursery of the church in which young plants are trained for the Master's use to become in due time "trees of righteousness," the planting of the Lord that he might be glorified. APPENDIX C.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Every Christian should pray that the State may be given to the Lord, and as members of the Baptist denomination, it becomes the duty of every one holding Baptist principles to do that which is in his power towards that end. If we believe that the principles upon which our church is founded conform to those promulgated by the Saviour, perpetuated by His Apostles, glorified at the stake, and surviving the direst persecution for centuries, how much the more is it encumbent upon us to advance doctrines in this day of religious liberty and freedom of conscience, from which nothing but good can result to our fellow-men?

As Baptists we naturally wish a wide dissemination of Baptist principles, and while we rejoice in the good accomplished by others, yet to be consistent Baptists, we desire the principles of the Baptist church to be spread all over this broad land, because we believe that they are identically the same instituted and practiced by Him who died that we might be saved. And we earnestly pray that the great heart of our denomination may be moved by the Holy Spirit in

reference to this great work.

State Missions is of paramount importance, and in proportion as they are in a healthy condit in so are the other objects of our Association. Suppose the Baptists of North Carolina contribute a given amount to Foreign Missions, Sunday Schools, and Ministeral Education, it follows, therefore, that if there were twice as many Baptists twice as much would be accomplished for the advancement of the Lord's kingdom here on earth. And it is our experience that in this manner our denomination has become strong, destitute places have been reclaimed, and the gospel has been preached by devoted men where its blessed influence was not known.

Then if it is proved to be our duty, be up and at work; we want no laggards in the camp. Remember that the Lord sitteth over against the Treasury and

knoweth whether we give according to our means.

Reports that come to us from the different sections are cheering. We believe that we are making progress, and we know that portions of the State that were destitute, now are blessed with self-sustaining, flourishing Baptist churches.

Bro. Ray, the Corresponding Secretary of the Board of State Missions, says

that we will need fourteen hundred dollars in order to go up to the Convention out of debt. It is so easy for the masses of the Baptist church to raise so small an amount. Let our Association do its duty.

However, much more remains to be done, the land is before us and the harvest is white unto the sickle, let us go forth and take possession in the name of the Lord. Let us help those consecrated men who have gone forth to work

in the Lord's vineyard, with our prayers and our means, and if we work in concert, earnestly praying for and expecting Divine blessings, we ought to have an abiding faith that what we ask will be given to us.

We would remember the holy injunction that is applicable to our whole work: "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and lo, I am with you alway even unto the end of the world."

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your committee beg leave to report to the churches of the Tar River Association that the work of preaching the Gospel to foreign nations is being gradually carried forward. The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention now has missionaries in Africa, Asia, Europe, South America and Mexico. From nearly every missionary station there comes tidings of success and of God's blessing. Abroad all is hopeful and encouraging. The disheartening feature is found at home in the apathy and indifference manifested by our churches toward this great work. It ought to be a matter of humiliation to us that 350 of the 685 Baptist churches of North Carolina are reported in the minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention as having contributed nothing whatever to Foreign Missions during the whole of last year. The other 335 churches contributed little enough.

Let us see to it, brethren, that the Tar River Association does her part in carrying out the great commission of our adorable Redeemer. Our own Associational missions are important, but let us not become so wrapped up in them

as to forget that the field is the world.

APPENDIX E.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Baptists in the South have preached a great deal in the country and deserve much credit, but they have neglected cities and towns. The Saviour and his apostles would go first into towns. The Home Board has supplied this great omission and cultivated many cities and towns in the South which have yielded a rich harvest to all our various Boards. It has cultivated towns in North Carolina and pushed the State forward 20 years on the tide of time. What it has been to North Carolina it has been to all the Southern States.

NEW ORLEANS.

Besides other cities and destitute places in the South, it is cultivating New Orleans, a city of 225,000 souls, one-half of whom are Catholics. Elder M. C. Cole attends the First church, supported partly by the First church and partly by the Mississippi Baptist Convention. He has two ladies with him supported by the same Convention.

Elder S. Landrum attends the Colliseum Place church supported in part by this church, and in part by the Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. The church debt is about \$10,000. The Southern Baptist Convention at Greenville, South Carolina pledged \$5,000 to pay the debt and the church will raise \$3,500 more or less.

We must cultivate the towns as did Christ and His Apostles.

CITY MISSIONS.

Baptists are beginning to have chapels and city missions North and South. One church in New York raised \$7,000 for city missions.

Though the Baptists in New York have forty churches and other denominations a great many, yet 700,000 in that great city do not attend church. They never will unless they have a great many plain chapels like those of London.

INDIANS.

The Creek Nation donated \$5,000 to a school building and \$8,400 to teaching and boarding annually. The Baptists in Baltimore and Louisville make much clothing for them. Pupils 120. Missionaries 6.

CALIFORNIA.

Dr. Hartwell, wife, and Mrs. Sanford are laboring among the Chinese of California; also Mrs. Bunting, whose salary is paid by the Baptist Convention of California.

The Baptists of North Carolina and South Carolina agreed to support Bro. Hartwell and wife. Let not the promise fall to the ground.

WOMEN'S WORK.

Of the 500 Women's Missionary Societies only thirty-one helped the Home Board in 1881. It is hoped that more will aid.

KIND WORDS.

Weekly, semi-weekly, monthly and quarterly lesson leaflets and Child's Gem combined together have a *monthly* circulation of 200,000; annually of 2,000,000. They have published three excellent catechisms.

They pay a royalty of \$1,000 per year.

RULES OF DECORUM.

Believing it to be our indispensable duty to enter into certain rules and regulations in conducting the business of this Association, we adopt the following:

1st. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2nd. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator by the appellation of brother.

3d. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted until he is done unless

he breaks the rules of this decorum.

4th. The person speaking shall strictly adhere to the subject, and in no wise reflect on the person who spoke before, but shall fairly state the case so as to convey his ideas.

5th. No brother shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the Associa-

tion without obtaining liberty.

6th. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without obtaining liberty from the Association.

7th. No person shall be at liberty to whisper in the time that a brother is

making a speech.

8th. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member, or prohibit his speaking, until he gives ideas on the subject, unless he violates the rules of this decorum.

oth. The names of the several members shall be enrolled by the clerk and called over as often as the Association requires.

10th. The Moderator may be entitled to give his ideas on any subject before putting it to a vote, but not entitled to vote only in case of a tie.

11th. Any member who shall knowingly break any of these rules, shall be reproved by the body as they may think proper.

CONSTITUTION.

1st. The Association shall be composed of the pastors, and of the members chosen by the different churches in our union, who shall be members whom they deem best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to a seat.

2nd. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excommunicated

and died since the last Association.

3rd. Members thus chosen and convened shall be denominated the Tar River Baptist Association, who shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any ecclesiastical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any of the churches of this union.

4th. The Association, when convened, shall have a Moderator and a Clerk,

who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

5th. Other churches may be admitted into this union, who shall petition by letter and by delegates, and upon examination, if found orthodox or orderly, shall be received by the Moderator giving the delegates the right hand of fellow-

6th. Any church in this union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association, but shall not send more than three members from each church.

7th. Every motion made and seconded shall be left to the discretion of the Association whether it shall be debated or not.

8th. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes. The best method for effecting this purpose shall be left to the discretion of the same.

9th. We think it absolutely necessary to have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For raising and supporting the same sum, we think it the duty of each church in this union to contribute voluntarily such sums as they may think proper and send it by the hands of their delegates to the Association, who shall be accountable to the same for all money received and paid according to the direction of the Association.

10th. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be,

and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises. 11th. The Association shall have power to enquire into the cause why the

churches do not, at any time of its sittings, represent themselves.

12th. The Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in this union, which may violate the rules of the same, or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

13th. The Association shall have power to invite all visiting brethren in the ministry from other churches or Associations, who they esteem of good moral

c aracter, and of the same faith and order, to sit with her in council.

14th. This Association shall not have power to exercise any authority over the private sentiments of individual brethren or churches, respecting the various institutions of the day, proposing to have for their object the spreading of the gospel, and the diffusion of useful knowledge.

15th. The Association shall have power to adjourn to any future time or

place they may think most convenient to the churches.

16th. This Constitution shall be subject to alteration when a majority of this Association think proper.

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

Bro. Hufham, for Chairman, read the encouraging report on Associational Missions:

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

During the year brethren McDuffie, Willcox, Harper, Duke, Woodson, Underwood, Carrick, Newell and Peele have been engaged in the mission-work. Middleburg, Vance county; Turkey Branch, Quankie, Harriss' Chapel, Fishing Creek, Free Chapel and Enfield, Halifax county; Battleboro, Nash county; several points in Martin county; Pactolus in Pitt county; Washington and Pantego in Beaufort county have been occupied.

At Middleburg steady progress has been made, and under regular and di-

rected labor, there will soon be a self-sustaining church at that point.

At Turkey Branch Bro. Willcox has labored statedly, and with encouraging At Turkey Branch Bro. Willcox has labored statedly, and with encouraging indications, though the brethren have been greatly cumbered by the necessary work of building a house of worship. A singularly beautiful and convenient house is in progress. Some seven hundred dollars have been expended thus far. A little help is greatly needed to furnish windows and doors so that the house can be occupied during the winter. It is an important enterprise and contributions to finish it will be worthily bestowed. At Quankie rich blessings have rested on the labors of Bro. Willcox. The church was organized two years ago with nine members; it now has more than forty. A comfortable house of worthin has been built and paid for and every indication is encouraging. Fifteen ship has been built and paid for and every indication is encouraging. Fifteen persons have been baptized into the fellowship of the church during the year. The brethren propose to support their own pastor hereafter; also, to contribute to sustain the mission-work of the Association.

At Harriss' Chapel Bro. Willcox has been laboring as voluntary missionary. A house has been built and paid for. During the year six persons have been

baptized.

Elder G. W. Coppedge has labored at three points in Nash county, baptizing

three persons and organizing one church.

At Enfield Bro. Woodson has been greatly encouraged. Thirteen have been added to the church during the year, and he is hoping for others at an early day. At Halifax he has not been without encouragement, though we are still without a church organization at that point.

At Fishing Creek Bro. Newell has been preaching for a few months, since the retirement of Bro. Freeman. It is too early for large visible results, though Bro. N. thinks that the field gives promise of a rich harvest in due season. The brethren are greatly hindered by the unfinished condition of their house of worship.

At Battleboro Bro. Duke has been preaching once a month to attentive con-

gregations, though there have been no additions to the membership.

At Free Chapel Bro. Harper has been preaching once a month. He reports nothing specially cheering in his field.

In Martin county Bro. Underwood has been steadily strengthening the cause

and has baptized two persons.

At Pactolus, Pitt county, Bro. Carrick has built a beautiful and commodious house of worship and organized a church at an important point, which has not

hitherto been occupied by the Baptists.

Bro. Carrick preached once a month for the little flock in Washington until June. At that time Bro. Thomas, of Portsmouth, Va., took charge of the church, giving to it all his time. We were hoping for large results from his labors, but he feels obliged to withdraw from the field at the end of the present month. We very earnestly commend this place to the consideration of your body. It is a town of several thousand inhabitants, and it is due the Master whom we serve that a good man and strong, be sustained there, so as to give his whole time to it.

At Pantego, a very important point, Bro. Peele has built a substantial and

beautiful house of worship and organized a church of seven members. He has also baptized two persons at that place. This work has been done at the cost

of great sacrifice and apostolic self-denial.

Looking over the work of the last year, there is abundant reason for thankfulness and encouragement. Looking over the four years that we have been engaged in this great enterprise, we have reason to feel that God has been with us, speaking to us that we go forward.

The field is large, and is opening to us more and more. In two of the counties within our extensive territory there is neither Baptist church nor preacher. In another large county there is only one church, now without a pastor, and for nearly two years without one. We are loudly called on to keep up our operations to the present standard and, if possible, to enlarge them.

APPENDIX B.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The great commission by our blessed Saviour to His disciples loses nothing of its authority by the lapse of centuries; its obligation is limited only by the extent of the whole human race, in all lands and in all ages; and the necessity for the discharge of the duty therein enjoined is inexpressibly great in our day, notwithstanding the abundant success that has already crowned the missionary efforts of modern times. So wonderfully has this work been blessed within the past 100 years, that where hardly one Christian could be found anywhere in heathen lands at the beginning of this period, the number of Protestant converts has now reached nearly 2,000,000. Statistics of this work show that in proportion to the number of missionaries employed and the amount of means expended Baptists have accomplished much more than others. The further fact is also shown that the annual percentage of increase of membership is at this time three times as great in the foreign field as it is in our own land.

The population of the world now is set down at 1,400,000,000. Less than 400,000,000 of these are nominally Christians, and of this number a full half are Roman Catholics. Upwards of 1,000,000,000 are heathen, Mahommedan, or Jews, who either know nothing of Christ, or are opposed to Him. These figures show how urgent is the present necessity, and how vast the magnitude of the work to be accomplished.

APPENDIX C.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We learn from the minutes of the last session of the Association, the only data now accessible to the committee, that of the 53 churches belonging to the Association only 27 are reported as having Sunday Schools. With these 27 churches there are connected 30 schools; and with these 30 schools about 2,000 persons. Of these 30 schools, 9 are reported as having libraries and as taking Kind Words; 6 as making contributions, and 15 as kept open all the year. If this is an approximate exhibit of the status of the Sunday School work in the borders of the Tar River Association, it reveals a lamentable amount of indifference with regard to this great interest.

We regard it as the duty of every church to have its Sunday School, and as the duty of every church member, who possibly can, to take some part in its work. We would urge upon the Sunday Schools the importance of supplying themselves with Bibles, papers, and other suitable literature and appliances. We would also beg them not to neglect the cultivation of Christian benevolence, and if possible to keep at work every month in the year and every Sunday in the month. Do your work patiently, faithfully, depending upon God for success, and then take the trouble to report the year's work to the next session of this body.

RULES OF DECORUM,

Believing it to be our indispensable duty to enter into certain rules and regulations in conducting the business of this Association, we adopt the following:

1st. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2nd. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his

seat and address the Moderator by the appellation of brother.

3d. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted until he is done, unless he breaks the rules of this decorum.

4th. The person speaking shall strictly adhere to the subject, and in no wise reflect on the person who spoke before; but shall fairly state the case so as to convey his ideas.

5th. No brother shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the Associa-

tion without obtaining liberty.

6th. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without obtaining liberty from the Association.

7th. No person shall be at liberty to whisper in the time that a brother is

making a speech.

8th. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member, or prohibit his speaking, until he gives his ideas on the subject, unless he violates the rules of this decorum.

oth. The names of the several members shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as the Association requires.

10th. The Moderator may be entitled to give his ideas on any subject before

putting it to a vote, but not entitled to vote only in case of a tie.

11th. Any member who shall knowingly break any of these rules, shall be reproved by the body as they may think proper.

CONSTITUTION.

1st. The Association shall be composed of the pastors, and of the members chosen by the different churches in our union, who shall be members whom they deem best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to a seat.

2nd. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excommunicated

and died since the last Association.

3rd. Members thus chosen and convened shall be denominated the Tar River Baptist Association, who shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any ecclesiastical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any of the churches of this union.

4th. The Association, when convened, shall have a Moderator and a Clerk,

who shall be chosen by the suffrages of the members present.

5th. Other churches may be admitted into this union, who shall petition by letter and by delegates, and upon examination, if found orthodox or orderly, shall be received by the Moderator giving the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

6th. Any church in this union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association, but shall not send more than three members from each church.

7th. Every motion made and seconded shall be left to the discretion of the

Association whether it shall be debated or not.

8th. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes. The best method for effecting this purpose shall be left to the discretion of the

9th. We think it absolutely necessary to have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For raising and supporting the same sum, we think it the duty of each church in this union to contribute voluntarily such sums as they may think proper, and send it by the hands of their delegates to the Association, who shall be accountable to the same for all money received and paid according to the direction of the Association.

10th. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be,

and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.

11th. The Association shall have power to enquire into the cause why the

churches do not, at any time of its sittings, represent themselves.

12th. The Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in this union, which may violate the rules of the same, or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

13th, The Association shall have power to invite all visiting brethren in the ministry from other churches or Associations, whom they esteem of good moral character, and of the same faith and order, to sit with her in council.

14th. This Association shall not have power to exercise any authority over the private sentiments of individual brethren or churches, respecting the various institutions of the day, proposing to have for their object the spreading of the. Gospel, and the diffusion of useful knowledge.

15th. The Association shall have power to adjourn to any future time or

place they may think most convenient to the churches.

16th. This Constitution shall be subject to alteration when a majority of this Association think proper.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

From what is said in the second epistle to Timothy, we have no doubt that the Apostle Paul was much interested on the subject of Ministerial Education. Hear him: "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works." 2 Tim. 3: 16, 17. This, taken in connection with what he had already said to Timothy in his first letter, ch. 4: 13, "Till I come, give attendance to reading, to exhortation, to doctrine," confirms us in the belief that no man was ever more earnestly interested in "Ministerial Education" than the Apostle Paul.

Read, my brethren, these passages of Scripture, and take into consideration all that is therein involved, and you will become more and more Apostolic on this subject than you have ever been. Paul was an educated man, and speaks from his own convictions as such, from whatever standpoint we may view this subject. There were special reasons for Paul's counsel to Timothy. He had to contend with the Jews and the Gentiles, who were well versed in Scriptural and general literature. To reason with the Ritualists, the Pharisees, Sadducees, Stoics, and other Philosophers, needed a competent knowledge of Arabic, Syriac, Hebrew, Greek and Latin languages and literature. No wonder Timothy must give himself to "reading" and "meditation."

Nor are there any less reasons at the present time with its old issues restated, and new ones projected, to be perfect, "thoroughly furnished unto all good works"; that "the man of God" should have all the advantages to be derived from the printed private closes and universities.

from the ministerial private classes, our colleges and universities.

We would, therefore, commend our young men who are looking to a consecration of themselves to the work of the ministry, to avail themselves of all the means in their power to prepare themselves so that they may be "thoroughly furnished unto all good works."

We would urge upon the churches the duty of liberal contributions towards the support of the dear young men who need their beneficence, and whom, we

trust, God has called to the work of the ministry.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your committee on Sunday Schools has been at some pains to examine the letters sent up by the churches to this meeting, and reports for your considera-

tion the following facts:

Twelve churches report an aggregate increase of 270 in their Sunday School numbers. Eight churches that made no report last year increase this aggregate to 729. Twelve of the churches report a decrease in their Sunday School numbers aggregating 92. Fifteen of the churches make no allusion in their letters to their Sunday School statistics. They may or may not have Sunday Schools.

Your committee would make two recommendations:

1. That the church clerks be requested to report their Sunday School statistics

in their letters to the Association.

2. That the Sunday Schools be requested to order their Sunday School supplies from our State Sunday School Board, located at Raleigh, Bro. John E. Ray, Secretary.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission work is one that appeals strongly to the Christian world for their sympathy, their prayers and their support. The great command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel unto every creature," plainly teaches the fact that it is the duty of those who have the Gospel to go themselves, or send it to those who are without it. The Southern Baptist Convention, through their Foreign Mission Board, located at Richmond, Virginia, are pushing this work with commendable zeal and marked success. We now have missionaries in Morthern, Central and Southern China, in Africa, in Italy, in Brazil, and in Mexico. Twenty- four in China, with some 28 native assistants are doing mission work in that country. In Africa we have seven missionaries, and some native assistants. In Italy, three missionaries, with an able corps of assistants; in Brazil four; in Mexico seven. God is signally blessing the labors of the faithful men and women whom the Board has sent to these various fields. When God opens the way we should be willing to follow. The Foreigu Mission Board calls on North Carolina for \$8,000 for the present Conventional year. Bro. O. F. Gregory, Vice-President for the Board for North Carolina, has apportioned this amount among the various Associations composing the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. The amount called for from our Association is \$300. Considering the size and resources of our Association, this amount ought to be raised without difficulty, and can be, by proper effort on the part of pastors and churches. Brethren, let us see to it that this amount is raised between this time and the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention next May.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention deserves our sympathies, prayers and contributions. It has for its field of labor the States and territories of our own Southern land. Its success, too, is encouraging. Last year it employed 144 missionaries, and by their labors, 4,190 persons were gathered into Baptist churches.

It is a matter of regret that only five of our half a hundred churches made

any contribution to this Board, and they gave a total of only \$17.37.

Shall we not do better next year for this Board? Let each church see that a collection is taken by April 1st, 1885, and the proceeds forwarded to the Treasurer of the Baptist State Convention.

CONSTITUTION.

1st. The Association shall be composed of the pastors, and of the members chosen by the different churches in our union, who shall be members whom they deem best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to a seat.

2nd. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excommunicated

and died since the last Association.

3rd. Members thus chosen and convened shall be denominated the Ta River Baptist Association, who shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any ecclesiastical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any of the churches of this union.

4th. The Association, when convened, shall have a Moderator and a Clerk,

who shall be chosen by the suffrages of the members present.

5th. Other churches may be admitted into this union, who shall petition by letter and by delegates, and upon examination, if found orthodox or orderly, shall be received by the Moderator giving the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

6th. Any church in this union shall be entitled to a representative in the As-

sociation, but shall not send more than three members from each church.

7th. Every motion made and seconded shall be left to the discretion of the

Association whether it shall be debated or not.

Sth. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes. The best method for effecting this purpose shall be left to the discretion of the same.

9th. We think it absolutely necessary to have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For raising and supporting the same sum, we think it the duty of each church in this union to contribute voluntarily such sums as they may think proper, and send it by the hands of their delegates to the Association, who shall be accountable to the same for all money received and paid according to the direction of the Association.

10th. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be,

and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.

11th. The Association shall have power to enquire into the cause why the

churches do not, at any time of its sittings, represent themselves.

12th. The Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in this union, which may violate the rules of the same, or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

13th. The Association shall have power to invite all visiting brethren in the ministry from other churches or Associations, whom they esteem of good moral

character, and of the same faith and order, to sit with her in council.

14th. This Association shall not have power to exercise any authority over the private sentiments of individual brethren or churches, respecting the various institutions of the day, proposing to have for their object the spreading of the Gospel, and the diffusion of useful knowledge.

15th. The Association shall have power to adjourn to any future time or

place they may think most convenient to the churches.

16th. This Constitution shall be subject to alteration when a majority of this Association think proper.

RULES OF DECORUM.

Believing it to be our indispensable duty to enter into certain rules and regulations in conducting the business of this Association, we adopt the following:

1st. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2nd. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator by the appellation of brother.

3d. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted until he is done, unless

he breaks the rules of this decorum.

4th. The person speaking shall strictly adhere to the subject, and in no wise reflect on the person who spoke before; but shall faiely state the case so as to convey his ideas.

5th. No brother shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the Associa-

tion without obtaining liberty.

6th. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without ob-

taining liberty from the Association.
7th. No person shall be at liberty to whisper in the time that a brother is

making a speech.

8th. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member, or prohibit his speaking, until he gives his ideas on the subject, unless he violates the rules of this

9th. Tha names of the several members shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as the Association requires.

10th. The Moderator may be entitled to give his ideas on any subject before

putting it to a vote, but not entitled to vote only in case of a tie.

11th. Any member who shall knowingly break any of these rules, shall be reproved by the body as they may think proper.
