ORGANIZATION

OF THE

Atlantic Baptist Association.

At a meeting of certain Brethren at LaGrange, N. C., on the 29th of October, 1884, W. G. Brinson was called to the chair. F. W. Hancock was chosen Clerk pro tem.

Prayer was then offered by Elder T. Whitfield.

The following statement was then made and its recommendation adopted:

The undersigned having been appointed by the Union Meeting of the Eastern Baptist Association, convened at Kinston, N. C., on the 28th of March, 1884, a committee to propose to the churches in the Northern section of the said Association, the formation of a new Association, and to make arrangements to facilitate its organization if approved, did accordingly communicate with those churches, proposing that they petition the Eastern Association for dismission, in order to organize a new Association, and that their delegates to the Eastern Association represent them in the Convention to form the new Association.

The churches whose names appear in the certificate accompanying this, accordingly approved of the proposed organization, and by their delegates or letters, petition the Eastern Association for dismission, which petition was approved and granted on the 8th of

October inst.

The delegates of said churches thereupon met, on the 8th of October inst., in the Meeting house of the Polloksville Baptist church, Elder T. Whitfield being chairman, and resolved to meet for permanent organization at LaGrange, Lenoir county, N. C., on the 29th of

October, 1884.

Therefore, we recommend that the list of said churches be called, and such delegates as were appointed to represent them in the Eastern Association at its recent session, or may have been appointed specially to represent them in this Convention, be recognized as constituents of a Convention now assembled, and that this Convention proceed to the permanent organization of a Baptist Association to be composed of such churches as may be here represented as aforesaid or by letter.

Articles of Faith, a Constitution, Rules of Order and a Church Covenant were then adopted. Adjourned until 2 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The following officers were then elected: W. G. Brinson, Moderator; W. G. Britt, Clerk; W. J. Montford, Treasurer; and the Association was declared organized.

Invitation was extended to visiting brethren to seats with us. The invitation was accepted by Elder Hill from the Cape Fear Association.

CONFESSION OF FAITH.

I. OF THE SCRIPTURES.

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us, and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true centre of christian union and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and opinions should be tried.

II. OF THE TRUE GOD.

We believe that there is one, and only one, living and true God, an infinite, intelligent Spirit, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of heaven and earth; inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

III. OF THE FALL OF MAN.

We believe that man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

IV. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION.

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial offices of the Son of God, who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience, and by his death made a full atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in heaven, and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate and an all-sufficient Savior.

V. OF JUSTIFICATION.

We believe that the great gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him, is justification; that justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood, by virtue of which faith His perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

VI. OF THE FREENESS OF SALVATION.

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the gospel, that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial, penitent and obedient faith, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own determined depravity and voluntary rejection of the gospel, which rejection involves Him in an aggravated condemnation.

VII. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION.

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

VIII. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH.

We believe that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby, being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on Him alone as our only and all-sufficient Savior.

IX. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE.

We believe that election is the eternal purpose of God, according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeabie; that it utterly excludes boasting and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God and active imitation of His free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the gospel; that it is the foundation of christian assurance, and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

X. OF SANCTIFICATION.

We believe that sanctification is the process by which, according to the will of God, we are made partakers of His holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration, and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the sealer and comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means, especially the word of God, self examination, self denial, watchfulness and prayer.

XI. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF THE SAINTS.

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special providence watches over their welfare, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

XII. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL.

We believe that the law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of his moral government; that it is holy, just and good, and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfil its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy law, is one great end of the gospel, and of the means of grace connected with the establishment of the visible church.

XIII. OF A GOSPEL CHURCH.

We believe that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by His word; that its only scriptural officers are bishops or pastors and deacons, whose qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the epistles to Timothy and Titus.

XIV. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER.

We believe that christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost, to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried and risen Savior, with its effect in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by solemn self examination.

XV. OF THE CHISTIAN SABBATH.

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day or Christian Sabbath, and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of grace, both private and public, and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

XVI. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT.

We believe that civil government is of divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society, and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored and obeyed, except only in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

XVII. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED.

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of our God, are truly righteous in His esteem, while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

XVIII. OF THE WORLD TO COME.

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CHURCH COVENANT.

Having been lead, as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Savior, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now, in the presence of God, angels, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Ghost, to walk together in christian love; to strive for the advancement of this church in knowledge, holiness and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the church, the relief of the

poor, and the spread of the gospel through all nations.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage; and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the Kingdom of our Savior.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Savior, to secure it without

delay.

We moreover engage that when we remove from this place we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this Covenant, and the principles of God's

word.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

Atlantic Baptist Association.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of delegates elected by churches connected with it, each church being entitled to five delegates; dele-

gates to be members of the churches they represent.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their own edification and for the spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "Newhampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, for substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise; and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that departs from the faith, or that treats with contempt

the objects or advice of the Association.


6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of 1, its locality; 2, the names of its pastor, clerk, clerk's postoffice, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; 3, the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; 4, the church statistics; 5, Sunday School statistics; 6, contributions to pastor's salary, church expenses, Associational Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Minute Fund, other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty; and this effort shall be continued until the church be recovered or dropped from the Associa-

tion.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

Bro. J. M. Wooten moves that the introductory sermon be preached to-night. Carried.

The election of officers being next in order, the Associa-

tion enters into election by ballot.

The following brethren are appointed tellers: To take the ballot for Moderator, Elder A. J. Hires and J. W. Biddle; for Clerk and Treasurer, Dr. J. S. Bizzell and M. S. Webb.

Elder C. A. Jenkens is elected Moderator, W. G. Britt re-

elected Clerk, and F. W. Hancock elected Treasurer.

Elder W. T. Jones moves that the report on Home Missions be taken up and discussed this afternon at $3\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock.

J. M. Wooten is added to the Committee on State Missions to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Elder W. B. Knight.

W. G. Brinson and C. L. Smith are added to the Committee on Periodicals in the place of Elder C. J. Nelson and

B. F. Dillahunt, who are absent.

Invitation is extended to visiting brethren to seats with us. Elder J. A. Leslie, of the Tar River Association, accepts the invitation as a representative of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

On motion of Elder Albritton, that clause in the General Order of Business relative to reading Constitution and Rules

of Order, is stricken out.

A Committee on Devotional Exercises and Arrangements is appointed consisting of pastor and deacons of this church.

Petitioning letters are called for. The churches at Bayboro and Capernaum ask for admission into this body.

On motion, the Association adjourns to meet at 2 o'clock. Benediction by Elder W. T. Jones.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Moderator calls the Association to order. Prayer by

Elder J. T. Albritton.

The committee to which was referred the matter of Bayboro and Capernaum Churches report that they find that Bayboro Church has been regularly constituted, and recommend that it be admitted. The report is adopted, and the delegates from Bayboro are welcomed by the Moderator.

Moved that the usual standing committees be appointed

at the convenience of the Moderator.

The report on Foreign Missions is read by Dr. Whitfield, and after being ably discussed by himself and Elder A. J. Hires, is adopted, each church agreeing to do as much or more than it did last year for this cause.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

God's Word delares that the heathen will inevitably perish unless the gospel be sent them, for they are idolaters, and these are shut out from "The City," Rev. 22:15, "and shall have their part in the lake that burns with fire." 21:8. They are sinners lost by nature, and unless they hear of the only Savior, cannot be saved. Acts 4:12. Our Lord Jesus has commanded his disciples to give the gospel to every nation, to every creature. So long, therefore, as there are any persons in the world who have not heard the gospel, our duty is imperative to give it to them. We are not required to convert all men, but to preach the gospel to all, and so give all an opportunity to be saved. This work has long been neglected. Although the professed christians have been able to do it, and are so now. What are the Baptists of the South doing to preach the gospel to those that have not heard it? We have fifty-one foreign missionaries. Of these only twenty-five are ministers. What a small force is this for one million white Baptists to send forth to tell 850,000,000 of heathen the way of salvation! How many of North Carolina's Baptist ministers have gone about this great work? Only one, though two others are now ready to go. How much do we give to send out the heralds of salvation to those perishing multitudes? Only \$4,456.71 last year, or four cents each from the 109,000 Baptists in the State.

Last year the churches composing this Association gave \$130.65. This is a small sum for 1,300 christians to expend in so great a work, and in a time of so great need. Brethren, we are called upon to arouse ourselves to obey the command of our Lord. The Board at Richmond asks this State for \$8,000. Of this amount this Association is asked to give \$175. We could do far more. One dollar each, or \$1,300, could be given without distressing any—nay, without depriy-

ing any of their usual comforts. And how little would even this be for sending the word of life to almost countless numbers who have never heard of Christ and heaven.

the most injurious.

As the welfare of our churches and the happiness of our fellowmen generally demand it, let us stand fairly upon the Bible platform of temperance.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Perhaps the most important object demanding attention at the bands of Southern Baptists is that of Home Missions. Besides its intrinsic merit, it is of paramount value in giving a strong back-ground and stimulus to Foreign Missions. It may be stated, in general terms,

that intense missionary spirit at home develops intense missionary spirit abroad, and vice versa; indifference to missions at home begets

indifference to missions abroad.

We rejoice to learn that the cause of Home Missions has met so generous a response from our people in the last few years, and we indulge the hope that it will steadily grow in favor until, by the liberality of our churches, all of the waste places of our Southern Zion shall be built up, and Home Missions shall be displaced by Foreign. But in order to such a happy consumation, our pastors must instruct their flocks on the subject, and see that they have an opportunity to honor the Lord by the gift of their substance. There is great destitution in Many weak churches struggling for existence; many our bounds. important points calling for help. We have but to mention poor, priest-ridden New Orleans holding out its hands for the word of life; and Florida, so rapidly rising into importance, to touch the heart and open the purse of all who in sincerity and in truth love the kingdom of the Lord. Great good has been already done; and by proper exertion and interest, and by humble prayer and faith, the South can be secured to the Baptists.

Your committee beg leave to recommend the following: 1st, That the churches of this Association raise during the coming year \$75 for this purpose. 2nd, That an agent in each church be appointed to see

that the proportionate amount of his church be collected.

Moderator calls the Association to order at 10 o'clock. Roll is called and minutes of the previous day read, and

after some corrections, are approved.

Invitation is again extended to visiting brethren to seats. Bro. John E. Ray, Corresponding Secretary of the Baptist State Convention, Bro. C. L. Smith of the BIBLICAL RECOR-DER, and Bro. H. W. Reinhart, of the Liberty Association, accept the invitation.

The committee to which was referred the matter of Capernaum Church, recommend that the church be received

into this Association. Report adopted.

The hour for the special order having arrived, the report on State Missions is again read, also the report of the Ex-

ecutive Board, and both taken up together.

The reports are discussed by Dr. Whitfield and John E. Ray, and at the close of Bro. Ray's address a cash collection is taken for the State Mission Board, amounting to \$40.73.

Pending the motion to adopt, the roll of churches is called, and the following pledges made for Associational Missions:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

DEAR BRETHREN: - Through the mercy of God we are permitted to present this our annual report of our labors for the year now closing. Under our recommendation the State Board appointed the following brethren to labor within the bounds of our Association: Elders W. T.

Jones, C. S. Cashwell and T. J. Leary.

We agreed to give the State Board \$200. Of this amount we have paid \$111.75; and the State Board appropriated \$450 to these brethren. In addition to this, we have agreed to give Bro. T. J. Leary \$25, Bro. C. S. Cashwell \$25. Brother W. B. Knight we have paid \$20.62, and Bro. D. F. Aman we have paid \$10.

THE WORK DONE.

Rev. T. J. Leary reports: Weeks of labor, 29; churches supplied, 4; out stations, 2; sermons preached, 85; protracted meetings 4; baptized, 29; prayer meetings held, 24; churches building, 1; Sunday schools, 3; collected for church building, \$290; collected on my field on salary, \$75; collected for State Missions, \$42. The prospects of the churches on my field are brightening. The prospect is also good at Hunting Quarter, one of the out stations reported.

Rev. C. S. Cashwell reported: Churche-supplied, 5; out stations, 1; sermons preached, 152; protracted meetings, 4; baptized, 24; collected for State Missions, \$50; collected for Foreign Missions, \$22.5r; collected on my field on salary, \$377.50. The prospects of the work on my field are good.

Rev. W. T. Jones reported: Weeks of labor 53; churches supplied, 2; sermons preached, 148; prayer meetings attended, 70; Persons and families religiously visited, 420; baptized, 10; Sunday schools in good condition, 2; collected for State Missions, \$64.50; collected for Foreign Missions, \$15; collected for building and church expenses, \$344.55.

In addition to this work I have organized a church at Bayboro, Pamlico county, with a membership of 16. A subscription to build a church has been raised amounting to about three hundred dollars. The prospect on my field is encouraging.

Brother Aman has baptized 9.

We have great reason to thank God for the great prosperity of our Association, and we recommend that the churches make greater efforts during the coming year for Associational Missions.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The Baptists of North Carolina may well say: "The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad." The statistical report found in the last State Convention minutes, published nearly a year ago, shows a white membership at that time in the State exceeding 120,000, and a total membership, white and colored, exceeding 231,000. And yet, sad to say, the Convention Board then reported much destitution in the State. Several whole counties were without a Baptist church or pastor, and several appeals for help claiming consideration that could not be responded to for lack of means.

Such a report should not have been made, because the statement should not have been true. And now, without delay, a proper denominational pride, to say nothing of higher and holier incitements, should impel the Baptist host to wipe away the reproach and shame involved in that report.

We of the Atlantic Association especially, should be deeply interested in State missions, for ours is probably the most destitute por-

tion of the State so far as Baptists are concerned. Destitution is around us, and even at our very door. Within our Associational lines Baptist churches and Baptist ministers are sadly few and far between. Lenoir has but one resident Baptist pastor; the same is true of Jones, and perhaps true of other counties within our bounds. And then by our side are Pamlico, Hyde and Dare counties, having neither a Baptist church nor preacher, excepting one little church on Roanoake Island in Dare.

What shall we say to these things? Your committee respectfully

recommend:

1st. That we express our full confidence in the State Board and our heartfelt interest in State Mission work by cheerful and gener-

ous contributions thereto.

2nd. That we cordially approve the action of the Board in securing the full service of our esteemed brother, John E. Ray, for the furtherance of this work, and that we pledge to him our co-operation, and a hearty welcome in our churches whenever he may come to see how we do, and to help us do more and better.

3rd. Your committee would also recommend that the Executive Board of this Association be advised to arrange at an early day with the American Baptist Publication Society to employ a missionary colporter to labor in the bounds of the Association, and seek a man

qualified for said work.

Stored up in the mind even in an unregenerate state, what a treasure it becomes, when, by God's grace, it passes from the mind to the heart.

The Sunday School has as its one great object the teaching of the Bible to the young, though its mission is not restricted, for in the great school of Christ all are learners, and every child of God may find profitable employment wherever God's word is taught and studied.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

During the colonial period of our country's history, the Baptists, in addition to their own educational and religious interests, were compelled by law to aid in supporting the ministry of the State establishments. In consequence their progress was necessarily slow. Yet the Baptists of the United States have to-day about one hundred academies, seminaries, colleges and universities, and nine theological seminaries. The total value of the property of these Baptist schools,

including endowments, is said to be over \$15,000,000.

Among these schools are our own Wake Forest College for our boys, our female colleges at Murfreesboro. Oxford and Thomasville, for our girls, and Louisville Theological Seminary for our ministerial students. We have twenty-eight young ministers at Wake Forest under the patronage of the Education Board, and eight of the young ministers now at the Theological Seminary are from North Carolina. The vastness of their field of labor, and the distressing scarcity of ministers drove the Baptists of America in very early times to turn their attention to the cause of ministerial education. As early as 1722 we find the brethren of the old Philadelphia Baptist Association advising "the churches to make inquiry among themselves if they have any young persons hopeful for the ministry and inclinable for learning, and if they have, to give notice of it to Mr. Abel Morgan before the 1st of November that he might recommend such to the academy or Mr. Hollis, bis account."

This same Association, at its session of 1756, "concluded to raise a sum of money towards the encouragement of a Latin Grammar school for the promotion of learning amongst us, under the care of brother Isaac Eaton." This effort resulted in the establishment of the Hopewell Academy, New Jersey, in which were educated, in part, many Baptist ministers, among whom was the renowned Dr. Manning, the first president of Brown University, the first Baptist college in America. God has wonderfully blessed these feeble beginnings, until we have grown into a vast denomination, with our educational institutions dotting these United States. Yet the demand for well qualified ministers has never been greater than it is to-day. Our work grows upon us daily, without a corresponding increase of men and means. "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few." Let us make prayerful and earnest effort for more laborers. Let us seek for ministerial gifts among our pious young men, and supplement these gifts with a liberal training in our institutions of learning. there are over 17,000 ordained Baptist ministers in this country, the number of Baptist churches exceeds that of ministers by more than

ten thousand.

Brethren, let the cause of ministerial education have a warm place in our hearts and a prominent place among the objects of our beneficence. The success or failure of this cause involves the success or failure of all our denominational enterprises.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory; and between the meetings of the Association, take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its objects.

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time

of service and details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 4th Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session, provided the amendment shall have been proposed at the preceding session and recorded in the minutes. The Rules of Order may be

amended at any annual session by a two-thirds vote.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches.

designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall have recorded and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the Minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.

5. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "Brother" in speaking of each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without

permission.

7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be in-

vited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided

by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.

11. The report of the Executive Board, and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

2. Election of officers.

3. Reading the Constitution and Rules of Order.

The report on Home Missions is read by Elder A. J. Hires, and after remarks by himself, is adopted:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The work of Christian Missions is one; when we speak of State, Home and Foreign Missions we only give the names of the fractional parts of an unit, as several fields are parts of one farm. The division is for the sake of convenience and better work, but let us never forget "The field is the world." There are reasons—some well based and weighty, others more or less selfish—why we may prefer one department of mission work above another, but there can be no valid reason for neglecting any part.

Among arguments for vital interest in Home Missions and vigorous prosecu-

tion of them, is:

First, That they art fut foremost in the Divine plan of evangelizing the world—For three years our Lord absolutely forbade the twelve and the seventy missionaries, whom He personally ordained and commissioned, to go beyond the borders of Palestine. And after that period, when He said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," He supplemented the great commission by saying, "Beginning at Jerusalem." These facts are, we

think, significant and suggestive.

Second, Our own country is one of the most hope-inspiring of mission fields on the face of the earth.—Our annual increase of population is amazing, and has no parallel in any other land under the sun. And this immense increase is largely by immigration from foreign lands. Boston has become nearly as Irish as Dublin; New Orleans nearly as French as Paris; several of our large cities nearly as German as Hamburg; and large portions of our land as Swedish as Stockholm; and as Italian as Rome. We have been slow to carry the gospel to the nations and God in his providence has sent the nations to us. We have peculiar advantages for evangelizing these people here, such as we cannot have in their native lands, advantages both of a civil and a religious character. And already many of our foreign born population have been savingly reached by the

gospel through American Home Missionaries. Moreover, a goodly number of them who have found Jesus have gone buck over the ocean to tell in their native lands the story of Jesus and his love. Thus, we see, home mission work is full of promise and helping on the cause of Christ even in foreign lands.

Third, and finally, the Home Mission work has powerful claims upon us as lovers of our country and our homes:

The ignorant masses of our native born population, the atheistic immigrants from Europe, and the heathenish immigrant from Asia, are an increasing and alarming menace of all we hold most sacred and dear. The blessed christian Sabbath-the rights of property-indeed, all the prized institutions of our civil and religious liberty, are threatened and encroached upon. The main question of the hour is, shall we instruct, elevate, and christianize them or shall they overthrow and destroy us?

The promulgation of the gospel, without question, is the most potent means

in our hands of saving ourselves and them.

The gospel of Christ, which is the power of God unto salvation, faithfully preached, may cleanse the slums of our national life, prove an antidote to abounding moral malaria, save our land from unreasonable labor leagues, from wicked communism, from devilish anarchism and dynamite. Let us stand by the Home Mission Board.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

At the request of the Executive Committee of the Atlantic Association, the State Board of Missions appointed the following brethren to labor within the bounds of this Association: Elder W. T. Jones at Beaufort and Morehead City at a salary of \$250; C. S. Cashwell, Jones and Onslow Counties, \$150; T. J. Leary, Carteret County, \$200; W. J. Fulford, Greene County, \$400, and D. F. Aman, Onslow County, \$25. In addition to these, Elder R. E. Peele has been laboring in the northern part of the Association at a salary of \$300, paid by the State Board. These brethren report the following items of interest:

Elder W. J. Fulford has preached III sermons at 2 churches and 4 stations, 30 weeks of labor; paid over 100 religious visits, baptized 9, added 4 by letter, organized 2 Sunday schools, distributed 12 Bibles and 75 religious tracts, col-

lected \$5.00 for State Missions, conducted 30 prayer meetings.

Elder W. T. Jones reports 52 weeks of labor, preached 136 sermons at 2 churches, attended 72 prayer meetings, paid 410 religious visits, held 2 pro-

tracted meetings, baptized 29, received 3 by letter and restored 17.

Elder C. S. Cashwell has performed 50 weeks of labor, preached 150 sermons at 5 churches and 2 stations, baptized 38, collected about \$400 on the field and \$105 for other objects. He is building a meeting house at Fort Barnwell, which is nearly enough completed to be used. Prospects are very encouraging.

Elder T. J. Leary reports 52 weeks of labor, preached 98 sermons at 4

churches and 2 stations, held 5 protracted meetings, baptized 13, prayer meet-

ings attended 25, religious visits 40, with I meeting house building.

Elder D. F. Aman has labored 10 weeks, preached 76 sermons at 1 church

and 3 outstations, held 57 prayer meetings, made 60 religious visits, baptized

18 and organized I Sunday school.

Elder R. E. Peele tells of 52 weeks of labor, 130 sermons preached, 3 churches and 4 stations occupied, 40 prayer meetings attended, 4 protracted

meetings held and baptized 52.

The prospects are brightening, the sun is rising higher and higher every day, and "the field is white unto the harvest." The cry from all parts of our destitution, as well as from every section of the State, is for more men to carry them the glad news of salvation. Shall we heed this call of our Saviour and occupy North Carolina for Jesus Christ?

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Glancing over the great harvest field of God that is now bleeding for the blade of the laborer, we feel that the time for the expression of common place-

platitudes on the subject of education is past; our duty now is plain-put our hands to the work and do it. Young men called of God into the field, in great numbers, are clamoring for an entrance into our schools and colleges, and our State Board of Education has not the means to support more than are now en-

The Board at Wake Forest has under its care thirty-three young ministers, and so far during this session has been compelled to decline to receive fifteen urgent applicants for lack of means to support them, being behind about \$700-

on their present work.

In view of these facts, we earnestly recommend that this Association make as large a contribution as possible toward liquidating the present debt of the Board at Wake Forest, and in addition to this, pledge itself to support two young ministers at Wake Forest College approved by a board composed of one delegate from each church contributing from this Association, each member of the board to have one vote for every ten dollars over and above the first ten contributed-each church giving anything be entitled, as a matter of course, to one vote. Said minister also to be approved by the Board of Education at Wake Forest. Respectfully submitted,

Provided, That one at a time of these young ministers may be prepared for college in some suitable high school to be selected by the committee.

On motion of Dr. Roberts, the time for adjournment is postponed for fifteen

Moved that the delegates from each church select one of their number as a member of the Education Board provided for in the report on Education.

Bro. F. W. Hancock makes some remarks concerning Elder Jacob Utley, an aged minister of Carteret county, and a collection amounting to \$10.78 is taken for his benefit.

On motion, the Association adjourns. Prayer by Bro. Hancock. Benediction by Elder Thos. Dixon, Jr. At 7 o'clock Elder Thos. Dixon, Jr., preached to a large congregation at the Opera House, after which a collection was taken for State and Associational Missions amounting to \$6.64.

THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

THURSDAY, October 28, 1886.

Devotional exercises are conducted by Elder C. S. Cashwell. Moderator calls the Association to order at the appointed time. Proceedings of the previous day are read and approved.

The delegates from the churches recommend the following as members of the Education Board, the pastors being allowed to name the member from the

On motion of Elder Thos. Dixon, it is ordered that a majority of the votes of this Board constitute a working majority.

The report on Foreign Missions is read by Dr. Whitfield, chairman of the

committee.

Pending the motion to adopt, the report is discussed by Dr. Whitfield, Elders Thos, Dixon, W. J. Fulford, and C. J. Nelson, and the following pledges are made for Foreign Missions:

Antioch, \$2.00; Davis Shore, \$2.00; Enon, 5.00; Falling Creek, 5.00; Fort Barnwell, 3.00; Goldsboro, 25.00; Kinston, 25.00; Morehead City. 10.00; Mount Calvary, 2.00; New Berne, 25.00; Piny Grove (Jones,) 2.00; Polloksville, 2.00; Snow Hill, 1.00; Smyrna, 3.00; Woodville, 3.00; Young Bethel, 5.00; Mrs. Dr. R. H. Lewis, 5.00.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Since your last meeting our beloved young brethren, D. W. Herring and R. T. Bryan, with their wives, have entered upon their labors in China, sailed in December. Bro. Herring located at Shanghai, Bro. Bryan Chinkiang -two great cities, each with more than a half million people. They arrived none too soon; for Bro. Hennix and Dr. Yates, the missionaries on the field were already worn down and have since been compelled to rest awhile.

Our young brethren and their wives are enthusiastic about their work, and earnestly preparing for it by studying the Chinese language. Besides these, the Foreign Mission Board has sent out nine missionaries to other fields.

The whole force now employed by the Board is 28 ministers, 30 ladies and 55 native assistants. According to its last report the membership in the mis-

sions was 1,398, and the baptisms for one year 169.

From the same report it appears that the contributions from North Carolina were \$6,021.57. It is encouraging to note this increase. Yet we are far below our duty. The Board asks us for \$8,000, and this is the very least that can be called our proportion of the amount absolutely necessary to support the present force. The proportion for this Association cannot be less than \$150. The most cheering reports reach us from Mexico and Brazil; but all our missionaries are hopeful and progress is being made all along the line. Everywhere our brethren in the field beg for reinforcements and for the prayers of the chnrches. We, therefore, appeal to the churches of this Association.

1st. To give to Foreign Missions regularly, liberally and cheerfully.

2nd. To appoint Foreign Mission committees to work specially for this enterprise.

3rd. To encourage the formation of Ladies' Missionary Societies.

4th. To take the Foreign Mission Journal.

5th. To pray daily that the gospel may speedily be preached to all the nations and accepted by them. To pray also for the lives and comfort of missionaries, their access to the people and their spiritual power.

About four churches have failed to meet the pledges made at the last Association, while the churches generally have more than met their pledges. Union Church, the only church that has failed to send up any contribution, is without a pastor, and your committee would rospectfully call the attention of the Executive Board to its need.

REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

During the past year only one of our brethren has been called away by death. On the 1th Sunday in March, 1886, Bro. B. McGlohon gently passed away. He had just finished reading his Bible through, and with it in hand he leaned across his bed dead. He was 67 years old, and had been a member of the Baptist Church about thirty-six years. His membership was with the church at Antioch, Pitt County.

The report on Temperance is next presented, and after being discussed at length by Elder W. J, Fulford is adopted.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Much has been done by the churches, the press and the people to prevent the sale and excessive use of intoxicating liquors. But we regret that there are so many, in and out of the church, who, while they would stamp their feet on drunkenness, are inclined to wink at and even practice what is called moderate drinking, the very source from whence cometh drunkenness. It is not with the man who lies in the gutter or wallows in the filth of the street our young men begin their dissipated career, but with the fashionable and respectable moderate drinker. Believing that the welfare of our churches, and the happiness of our fellow-men generally demand it, we recommend that all our members in particular, and every one in general, abstain from its use as a beverage.

The Baptist Orphanage is under the management of an Association regularly chartered by the laws of the State. Its object, that of educating and caring for indigent orphans, appeals to every true christian, and if we have the love of Christ in our hearts, our sympathies will go out for this cause in no uncertain manner. The need of supporting this work is laid upon us as Baptists. It is one that we cannot shirk if we would. Have the churches of this Association come up to the full measure of their several duties in regard to this great charity? It is not a work of a day which can be thrown aside with a single gift, but requires a continuous systematic plan of contributions.

"We then that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak and not to please ourselves." Of the abundance of our stores, let us contribute to this cause. We commend this work to the churches as deserving our prayers, sympathies and contributions, and would urge that each one adopt some plan of

RULES OF ORDER.

I. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches, designating

them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates

of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall have recorded and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the Minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.

5. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "Brother" in speaking of each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy

that becomes Christians.

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission. 7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to seats,

with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9. A copy of the Minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by Mell's

Parliamentary Practice.

II. The report of the Executive Board, and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12. The General Order of Business shall be:

I. Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.

2. Election of officers.

3. Petitionary letters.

4. Appointment of committees for this session.

5. Appointment of Standing Committees.

6. Report of committees on churches delinquent at the previous session.

7. Reports of standing committees.

8. Reports of other committees.

Miscellaneous business.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

ATLANTIC BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

I. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of delegates elected by churches connected with it, each church being entitled to five delegates; delegates to be members of the churches they represent.

3. Its objects shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their own edification and for the spread

of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The 'New Hampshire Declaration of Faith' shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, for substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise; and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that departs from the faith,

or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday school statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary, church expenses, Associational Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Minute Fund, other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter; or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall-be continued till the church be recovered or dropped from the Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

o. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its objects. The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 4th Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen. Representatives

from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session, provided the amendment shall have been proposed at the preceding session and recorded in the minutes. The Rules of Order may be amended at any annual session by a two-thirds vote.



PROCEEDINGS.

GOLDSBORO, N. C., Tuesday, Oct. 25, 1887.

The Atlantic Association meets in its fourth annual session with the Goldsboro church. Devotional exercises are conducted by Rev. J. T. Albritton. After which, Dr. Theo. Whitfield, Moderator of last session, calls the Association to order.

On motion of Rev. A. J. Hires, the deacons of Goldsboro church are ap-

pointed a committee on Religious Exercises and Arrangements.

Dr. J. D. Roberts and Rev. C. A. Woodson are appointed Reading Clerks. Letters are read from the churches and delegates enrolled as follows:

The report on Foreign Missions is called for and is read by Rev. A. J. Hires, and, on motion, is made the special order for to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

On motion, the rules are suspended to hear a report on Bible Society Work, which report is read by Rev. A. J. Hires. The report, after remarks by Rev. A. J. Hires and Rev. C. A. Woodson, is adopted, as follows:

REPORT ON BIBLE SOCIETY.

WHEREAS, The Bible Department of the American Baptist Publication Society is now the approved Bible Society of American Baptists; and the only Bible Society with which they can honorably co-operate and work; and

Whereas, This Society is doing much Bible distribution work in the South; and also supplying our Foreign Mission Board with funds needful to their

work of Bible translation and publication on foreign fields; and

Whereas, The Baptists justly regard God's word essential to Bible christianity, and an open Bible the great need of all people; and the work of supplying the destitute of our own land and of the nations of earth is now press-

ing upon the Society-

Resolved, That we recommend our churches to make an annual collection for this object, at least; that our Sunday Schools observe the annual Bible Day exercise appointed by the Bible Society, and arranged for with programmes without expense to the schools, which may be obtained from Rev. C. C. Bitting, D. D., Corresponding Secretary, No. 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia.

The report on the Baptist-Orphanage is read by Rev. J. T. Albritton and is discussed at length by himself, Dr. J. D. Roberts, Rev. W. J. Fulford, F. W. Hancock and J. M. Wooten.

By unanimous consent, it is agreed that a collection be taken for the Or-

phanage after the sermon to-night.

The committee on Religious Exercises report that the introductory sermon will be preached to-night at 7½ o'clock; prayer meeting to-morrow morning at 9½ o'clock, to be conducted by Rev. W. J. Fulford.

On motion, the Association adjourns with prayer by Rev. J. F. Love.

NIGHT SESSION.

At 7½ o'clock the introductory sermon is preached by Rev. A. J. Hires, from Matthew 10th chapter, 32d and 33d verses. After which, the report on the Baptist Orphanage is again taken up. The report is re-read, and, after being feelingly and ably discussed by Dr. J. D. Hufham, is adopted.

A cash collection for the Orphanage is taken amounting to \$22.23.

REPORT ON THE BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

No class of unfortunates are more helpless, or friendless, or have stronger claims upon our sympathy and substantial aid, than that class for which the Thomasville Orphanage seeks to provide. Long, long ago, Homer said conconcerning the orphans:

"The day that makes
A child an orphan, leaves him destitute

Of every friend,—a melancholy youth.

He pines, and sighs, and bathes his cheeks with tears. Oppressed and poor, he seeks his father's friends; One by the robe, another by the coat, He pulls, and begs them. Some who pity feel Offer a pittance in a scanty cup. To wet his lips, not satisfy his thirst, While others, flourishing in joyous ease. With both their parents living, rudely smite The wretched boy, and drive him from their board With scorn, unfeeling and reproachful speech."

Many of these helpless children are surrounded by influences that will make of them worthless vagabonds, monsters of vice, and inmates of iniquitous dens, jails and penitentiaries. The hand of charity may save them; God pities them—punishes those who afflict them—and blesses those who bless them. Said He to Israel: "If thou afflict them in any wise, and they cry at all unto me, I will surely hear their cry; and my wrath shall wax hot, and I will kill you with the sword; and your wives shall be widows; and your children fatherless." Ex. 22: 23, 24.

Some of us thought the Thomasville Orphanage a superfluous work. Yet the Manager is compelled to turn away orphans for want of room and provision for their support. Only a few weeks ago, about seventy orphans were in the asylum and thirteen cents in the treasury! Seventy orphans to feed and clothe—more seeking admission—the cold winter approaching—vegetables gone—and only thirteen cents in the treasury! Brethren, the needs of the Orphanage demand increased and continued efforts on the part of the Baptists of North Carolina. We recommend the appointment of a committee in every church of this Association, to make collections and forward to the Orphanage monthly or quarterly. We commend to the brethren Charity and Children, a weekly paper published at the Orphanage at \$1.00 per year.

Second, That it does not become us to accuse our pedo-baptist neighbors of treating with neglect the Saviour's commandments, if we ourselves are not obeying the command contained in the great commission above quoted, for in that case we can neither claim to be consistent christians nor consistent gospel churches. A few cents to the cause of christian missions when we might give dollars, is as truly out of character as a few drops of water in place of christian baptism. We do not receive into our churches unbaptized persons, and like consistency demands that we do not hold in membership any who are antimission in spirit and conduct.

Third, That while the cause of Foreign Missions has always been as bright as are the promises of God, we have ever increasing evidences that our labor in

this behalf is not in vain in the Lord.

From almost every field occupied by faithful missionaries—notably from those in South America—the news of success is increasingly glorious and inspiring.

As Baptists, we need educated men and women, well grounded and instructed, not only in general literature, but also in the principles which distinguish us as a denomination.

This our Baptist Schools and Colleges give us, and we would commend Wake Forest College for our boys, and the Murfreesboro, Oxford and Thom-

asville Schools for our girls.

An educated ministry is a necessity. God in His providence calls the poor in this world's goods to preach His gospel, and it is a duty laid upon us to give them the means of properly fitting themselves for the work before them. now have at Wake Forest College forty ministerial students, twenty-five of whom are aided by the Educational Board, with twenty-seven applicants for aid whom the Board have not been able to receive. The Board now has a debt of near \$1,000,00 hanging over it. Under the action of this body last year, we are now aiding two young brethren in securing an education preparatory to entering the ministry, and your committee deem it essential that we continue this aid under the same regulations as adopted at the last session. REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

By reference to the minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention for 1887, it may be seen what a grand work our Home Mission Board is doing. Board is continually calling for more men and more means to do the work, which God in His providence is opening up before our people. We boast so much of the civilization and progress of our country, and congratulate ourselves so frequently as to our civil and religious liberty, that we are in danger of forgetting how many-thousands of unsaved souls there are in our midst. America is, indeed, increasing rapidly in population; she is making great strides in every department of human progress and enterprise, but we must remember that Satan is not yet "bound," and the evil is abroad in the land, and it behooves those who contend for the "faith once delivered to the saints," to be watchful and faithful. The Mission work, Foreign and Home, is our work. We should never ignore the strong claims that the heathen have upon us for the Bread of Life, nor should we forget the heathen on our own shores.

We should pity Ethiopia as she stretches forth her hand, we should listen to the cry of the man of Macedonia as he calls for help, but we should not for-

get the "stranger within the gates."

America seems destined to become the political centre of the earth. God grant that she may become the religious centre. Owing to the close commercial relations of the leading nations of the earth, owing also to the rapid means of transit from one to another, the heart throbs of American civilization and religion are being felt to the uttermost parts of the earth. This renders it extremely important that the fountain from which issue so many waters should be kept pure.

The Home Mission work then appeals strongly to American Baptists, especially as we claim, and not without reason, that God's word alone is our coun-

sellor and guide, so far as our faith and practice is concerned.

Italy to-day furnishes a sad reminder of what a mutilated faith and an emaculated christianity will do for a country. Let us then give cheerfully and liberally for the support of our Home Board. All over the west, in many parts of the south, there are great harvest fields ready for the sickle. Where are the reapers?

We should pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth more reapers, but then as His stewards we should give cheerfully of our means so that when our Lord shall come to "reckon with us," we may be found to have been "faithful ser-

vants."

CONSTITUTION

OF THE .

ATLANTIC BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

I. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of delegates elected by churches connected with it, each church being entitled to five delegates; delegates to be members of the churches they represent.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their own edification and for the spread of

the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, for substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise; and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that departs from the faith,

or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk. clerk's post office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church stetistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary, church expenses, Associational Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Minute Fund, other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or dropped from the Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its objects. The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 4th Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen. Representatives

from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session, provided the amendment shall have been proposed at the preceding session and recorded in the minutes. The Rules of Order may be amended at any annual session by a two-thirds vote.

12. The Association shall appoint annually an Education Board of five members - To this Board shall be referred all applicants for ministers and in Their education.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches, designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates

of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall have recorded and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the Minutes, preserve a file, of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.

5. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "Brother" in speaking of each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

- 6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission. 7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.
- 8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.
- 9. A copy of the Minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by Mell's

·Parliamentary Practice.

11. The report of the Executive Board, and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12. The General Order of Business shall be:



On motion, the Association adjourned until 2 o'clock with prayer by

Dr. John Mitchell.

AETERNOON SESSION.

The Association met at the time appointed and prayer was offered by Rev. J. S. Dill.

The election of officers being in order, the Association proceeded to the election.

On motion, the election of all the officers was taken at the same ballot. Brethren J. F. Love and Benj. Ward were appointed tellers. J. Y. Joyner was elected Moderator and W. G. Britt re-elected Clerk.

F. W. Hancock having declined a re-election, J. A. Pridgen was

placed in nomination and elected Treasurer.

On motion, the Moderator extended an invitation to visiting brethren to seats. Dr. John Mitchell accepted the invitation as a representative of the Board of Education at Wake Forest College, and was welcomed by the Moderator.

On motion, the report on Education was made the special order for

to-morrow at 21 o'clock.

The committee on Religious Service made a report, which, after being amended, was adopted, as follows: That the Association meet to morrow at 9½ o'clock, adjourn at 12, meet at 2 and 7 P. M. and adjourn at pleasure, and that the Introductory sermon be preached to-night; also, that Dr. Mitchell preach a Missionary Sermon to-morrow at 11 o'clock.

Petitionary letters were called for and none presented.

On motion of Rev. A. J. Hires, Rev. J. S. Dill was placed on the committee on Home Missions in the place of Rev. W. J. Fulford, who was absent. Rev. H. W. Battle on the committee on Education in place of Rev. C. S. Cashwell, and Rev. J. F. Love on the committee on Temperance, in place of J. B. Turner.

The Moderator appointed the following committees to report at the

present session:

On Place and Preacher for next Session—J. M. Wooten, J. W. Isler, C. J. Nelson.

On Delinquent Churches—Rev. A. J. Hires, A. M. Prince, M. S. Webb. To Nominate an Executive Board—Rev. H. W. Battle, Rev. J. F. Love, J. C. Whitty.

On motion of Rev. J. S. Dill, the committee to nominate an Executive Board was also empowered to nominate a delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Rev. A. J. Hires of the committee on Delinquent churches, made a verbal report, and also some remarks in regard to Union church, and on motion, the report was laid on the table until the next day.

On motion of Rev. C. J. Woodson, it was ordered that the collection

to-night be given to the Board of Education.

The report on State Missions was read by Rev. A. J. Hires, and on motion, it was laid on the table and made the special order for Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

It was moved and carried that Rev. J. F. Love be invited to present

the claims of Bayboro church Wednesday night.

The report of the committee on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. C. A. Woodson, and after being discussed by himself, Rev. H. W. Battle, Rev. J. S. Dill, Dr. Mitchell, Rev. J. T. Albritton and Rev. A. J. Hires, was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Foreign Missions submit the following for your consideration:

By an unusual combination of circumstances, the cause of Foreign Missions has received a considerable impetus, in its forward course, during the past year. This has resulted partly from the fact that quite a number of godly men and women have gone to the foreign field since our last annual meeting; also in part from the fact that greater interest has been excited among our churches in the Foreign Mission work by the heroic death at the post of duty, of some of the faithful men and women sent to the foreign field—notably the veteran M. T. Yates. The Lord seems to be laying peculiar honor on North Carolina, in calling so many of her sons and daughters for the performance of this great work.

There is, consequently, no State within the bounds of our Convention that has greater cause to cultivate a deep and abiding interest in this work of sending the gospel to the heathen. This interest will be best

shown by our sympathy, our prayers, and by our contributions.

Rev. R. T. Bryan, one of our younger missionaries at Chinkiang,
China, in a recent letter published in the Recorder, earnestly recommends the plan of churches and Associations, assuming the support of missionaries. This is mentioned for your thoughtful consideration. The time may not have come for this body to assume such support; some may doubt the wisdom of the plan, but certainly no harm can result from a courteous discussion of plans suggested by our missionaries on the field, and a study of our available means, that we may know the better what we can or ought to do in the Master's service.

The fields occupied by our Board are as follows: Northern, Central and Southern China, Africa, Italy, Brazil and Mexico. That our people may be better informed as to the work on these fields, we carnestly recommend that they subscribe for and read the Foreign Mission Jour-

nal, published at Richmond, Va.

Resolved, That Article X of the Constitution be amended by inserting after the word "chosen" the following words: And an Introductory Sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. And that Article XI be amended by striking out after the word "session" in the first line, all that follows and inserting the words, "by a vote of twothirds of the members present."

On motion, the subject of Home Missions was made the special order

for to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

Rev. H. W. Battle led in prayer, and on motion, the Association

adjourned.

At night Rev. C. A. Woodson preached the Introductory Sermon from Songs of Solomon, 6th chapter and 3d verse, after which, Dr. Mitchell made some remarks in regard to the educational work at Wake Forest College, and a collection amounting to \$7.08 was taken for that object.

SECOND DAY-MCRNING SESSION.

Wednesday, October 31st, 1888.

The Association was called to order at $9\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock and Rev. J. S. Dill led in prayer.

Proceedings of the previous day were read and approved.

Rev. J. F. Love was welcomed by the Moderator as a messenger from the East Chowan Association.

The report of the committee on the Baptist Orphanage was read by Bro. J. M. Wooten, and on motion, was laid on the table until the arrival of the representative of the Orphanage.

The hour for the special order having arrived, Rev. J. S. Dill read the report on Home Missions, and after being discussed by Bro. Dill, Rev. H. W. Battle and Bro. J. M. Wooten, was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is, during the present year, prosecuting its work with increasing zeal and success. Its important missions in the west, especially in Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas, have been wonderfully blessed of the Lord. An increased number of consecrated men are working under this board in all of our weaker States and territories. Good work is also being done in

Florida and Western North Carolina.

The work in Cuba under Bro. Diaz, which has been committed to this Board, is one of the great wonders of modern missions. Now, in only its third year, the church in Havana numbers 1.000 members and great multitudes flock continually to hear the pure gospel. A prominent and highly educated priest of the Catholic church has joined the Baptist faith and is rendering valuable aid. A large tent has been provided for temporary use to accommodate the people, and an effort is being made to build a suitable church house in Havana. Aid for this work is especially needed at this critical period in the development of the pure gospel in the land of Cuba.

The Home Board has recently begun the publication of a paper called the *Home Field*, which is doing good service in giving information of the home work, and we earnestly commend it to the patronage of the

Association.

The Kind Words series is gaining in favor and the Board is gratified

by its reception among the majority of our Sunday Schools.

In view of the increased labors and efficiency of this Board, your committee would press it upon the notice of our churches and urge that every church in the Association give to it at least one collection during the year. The Home Board is located in Atlanta, Ga., with Dr. I. T. Tichenor as Secretary, but all contributions had better pass through the hands of our Association or State Convention Treasurer.

The report of the Committee on Education being the special order for this hour, the report was called for and read by Rev. H. W. Battle, and after an interesting discussion by Dr. Mitchell, Rev. C. A. Woodson, J. E. Peterson, J. C. Whitty, Rev. H. W. Battle, F. W. Hancock and Rev. A. J. Hires, was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The cultivation of the mind is both a privilege and a duty. A privilege, because of the enjoyment realized from well disciplined faculties on the part of the individual: a duty—blended with privilege—because of vastly increased capacity for usefulness, thus attained in any legitimate sphere of life. But, like other mighty agencies for good, education perverted becomes a medium for the propagation of evil, an enemy to truth, and a curse to the race. It is, therefore, a matter well calculated to inspire gratitude to God, and confidence in our future as a denomination, that we have institutions of learning where all the lore of the schools is sanctified by the salutary influences of genuine and profound piety. Conspicuously prominent are Wake Forest College, and the female colleges located at Murfreesboro, Oxford and Thomasville. Too great emphasis cannot be given to that most important work, in which Wake Forest College is so nobly and successfully engaged—the education of young men who have been chosen to become the heralds of the Cross. There are now at Wake Forest about 40 ministerial students, 32 of whom are receiving aid from the Educational Board.

This Association is represented at the college by two young brethren who are being educated and supported preparatory to their life-work in the ministry, and we deem it of the greatest importance that there be generous and systematic contributions from the churches, that these

brethren may be sustained and the good work carried on.

The following resolutions offered by Rev. C. A. Woodson were adopted: Resolved, 1st. That this Association adopt Bro. E. F. Rice, now at Wake Forest College, as a ministerial student.

2d. That the President of the Educational Board of this Association

inform Bro. Rice of this action of the Association.

The committee appointed to name the place of meeting of the next Associatioon, recommended Piny Grove (Jones), Rev. H. W. Battle to preach Introductory Sermon and Rev. J. T. Albritton, Alternate; which recommendation was adopted.

Rev. F. R. Howell, a colored brother, representing the American Baptist Home Mission Society of New York, was allowed to make a statement in regard to the work in Newberne, and permitted a collection for

that object. Amount received, \$5.82.

Dr. R. H. Lewis gave notice of a proposed amendment to the Constitution to be acted upon at the next session of the Association, as follows:

The Association shall appoint annually an Education Board of five members, and to this Board shall be referred all applications for aid in

ministerial education.

The report on Temperance was read and adopted, as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The time was when not only the moderate use of intoxicating liquors, but also their manufacture and sale, were considered by many as no violation of God's law, and no barrier to Christian or church fellowship. But the fearful and growing evils of intemperance which have troubled us so much, both in and out of the church, have induced our people to give a more thorough and conscientious study to those parts of God's Word that bear on the temperance question. Hence, the sentiment of a large portion of our people in and out of the church, is that Bible temperance means the moderate use of what is lawful, and total abstinence from what is hurtful. The Bible teaches plainly that "wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging, and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." It produces woe, sorrow, contentions, babblings, wounds without cause, redness of eyes, and if persisted in will bring eternal ruin upon both soul and body.

Considering the destructive power and fearful influence of the liquor traffic, and the awful results of intemperance, we recommend and urge upon the Christians to abandon its use as a beverage, and stand squarely

upon the Bible platform of temperance.

On motion, the report on Periodicals was taken from the table and discussed. Dr. C. T. Bailey, Editor of the Biblical Recorder, being present was welcomed by the Moderator and spoke upon the report. Bro. C. J. Nelson also made some remarks, and on motion, the report was adopted:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

One of the most potent factors in the education and progressiveness of the present age is its periodical literature. He who fails to recognize the potency of this factor must necessarily lag behind his wiser competitors, whatever may be the calling which engages the energies of his life. If a man should take a periodical devoted to his business, surely he should take a periodical devoted to his religion, for the simple reason that religion is of far greater importance than business. The Baptists of North Carolina should take first of all the *Biblical Recorder*, because it is the organ of the denomination in the State, the faithful exponent and defender of our distinctive principles, the medium of communication by which we become acquainted with one another and provoke one another to good works, and lastly, because of its earnest advocacy of the many enterprises which claim our attention and enlist our sympathy and aid.

We also commend to our brethren the Gospel Herald, published by the State Mission Board, at fifty cents a copy, one dollar for four copies, and fifteen dollars for one hundred copies; also Charity and Children, published at Thomasville, in the interest of the Baptist Orphanage at \$1.00 per year: also the Foreign Mission Journal, of Richmond, Va., the Home Field, of Atlanta, Ga., and the Baptist Sunday School papers

and Lesson Helps, published at Atlanta and Philadelphia.

The report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was read by J. S. Dill. and after remarks by C. J. Nelson, J. M. Wooten, J. S. Dill and J.

B. Williams, was adopted.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

On examination of the church letters, we find that there are fourteen churches maintaining regular Sunday schools, and eight without schools. We consider this encouraging, but would impress upon the churches without Sunday schools, the great importance of at once organizing them. It is next to impossible for a church to have vitality and continuous growth without this important aid to the training and development of the children.

Especially, would we commend to churches not enjoying regular preaching every Sunday, that the Sunday school presents an excellent opportunity for bringing together the members of the church on every

Lord's day for the study of God's Word.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

Our Orphanage at Thomasville, N. C., is an institution of which every Baptist should feel proud, and feel a deep interest in the welfare of the little ones there. There are about 93 orphans sheltered and fed at that home. It requires much food and clothing for those that are to be cared for. When we remember that the children there gathered are our family, the children of the great Baptist Brotherhood of North Carolina, it brings them very near our hearts.

Now, we want something solid and substantial for the orphanage. While we feel thankful that the church letters show that the orphans have been remembered, yet the half has not been done that can and should be done. We would, therefore, recommend to all our churches to try to get each member to take Charity and Children. The paper is now 12 pages, and has increased from 500 to over 2,000 copies weekly, and costs only one dollar. Aside from the charity in the case, the paper

is richly worth the money.

We would further recommend to all churches that do not have a regular system for the collection of funds, that they take up regular collections for the support of the orphans. We farther recommend that each Sabbath school in the Association set apart the first Sunday in each month as a day to take a collection for the orphans.

Brethren, we commend this work to you, feeling that it is our work as Baptists. Let us all pray God for His blessing on the work and He

will give it. Respectfully submitted,

The report of the Executive Board and the report on State Missions were further discussed with special reference to the Colportage work. Remarks were made by F. W. Hancock, C. Durham, and Dr. C. T. Bailey, and both reports adopted.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The work of evangelizing our own State has lost none of its importance, nor of its binding claims upon our churches. Much has been done since this work was inaugurated; much remains to be done before

it is completed.

The State Board is prosecuting the work aggressively and successfully. The Corresponding Secretary is untiring and the missionaries are faithful. Since the last meeting of the State Convention, 87 missionaries and 13 colporters have been commissioned. Five of these missionaries have labored within the bounds of the Atlantic Association, two of them

wholly, and the others partly. Let us do our full share of pressing on the work in hearty co-operation with the Board. "Blessed are ve that sow beside all waters.'

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

Since the last report, the State Board, with our concurrence, re-appointed Bro. C. A. Woodson to the work at Morehead City and Beaufort, \$250.00; Bro. W. J. Fulford at Snow Hill and Greene county, \$350; Bro. C. S. Cashwell at Dover Station and French's School House, \$100; and also appointed Bro. J. F. Love at Bayboro, in addition to his work in the Tar River Association, \$100; and Bro. Benjamin Ward in Onslow county. \$25, making a total of \$825 appropriated in our Association.

After six months, Bro. Fulford resigned his work and removed to another Association, and much to our regret, no one has been found to

occupy the field thus vacated.

Bro. T. J. Leary resigned his work at the beginning of the Associational year. Considerable effort was made to find a missionary for that field, but all in vain. Later in the year, Bro. Leary reconsidered the matter and was willing again to take up the work. Then, however, the Board had appropriated as largely as they dared, and have not been willing since to increase their obligations. The result has been that Bro. Leary's ministry has been greatly hindered by the necessity of finding support for himself and family.

In view of the great destitution occasioned as above stated, your Board have desired, and made some effort to obtain a general missionary or evangelist, who would also do colportage work, but unavailingly.

Under existing circumstances, we see nothing that would better meet present necessity and save our weak churches from depletion, than to put the right kind of a laborer for this general work in the field, but where that kind of a man is to be obtained, we know not. That something should be done without delay to "strengthen the things that remain—that are ready to die," is distressingly evident. "Pray ye, therefore, the Lord of the harvest, that He send forth laborers into the A. J. HIRES, harvest." Chairman.

On motion of Rev. J. S. Dill, the matter of employing a colporter was referred to the Executive Board.

The Treasurer's report was read and approved. (See pages 14 and 15.) The report of the Committee on Delinquent Churches was read and adopted, as follows:

The Committee on Delinquent Churches report, that Piney Grove (Onslow), Smyrna. Young Bethel and Union churches, have sent neither delegates nor letters at this meeting, and we recommend that the cause of this neglect be early inquired into by the Executive Board.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

✓ ATLANTIC BAPTIST ASSOCIATION. ▷

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic

Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their own edification and for the spread of the gospel accord-

ing to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the Summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, for substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that departs from the faith, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association,

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) The Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to paster's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, State Missions, Home Mission's, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund, other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered

or dropped from this Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a

Clerk and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all

funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Associations take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its objects,

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's reports of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 4th Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory Sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual

Session by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

ciation adjourned.

At night Rev. H. W. Battle preached the Introductory Sermon from II Kings, 2nd chapter, 14 verse. Subject. "The God of Elijah."

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 30, 1889.

The Association was called to order at 9:30 o'clock, and Rev. J. B. Carroll conducted the devotional exercises.

Proceedings of the previous day were read and approved.

On motion, the report on Home Missions was postponed to 10:30 o'clock.

Article 2nd of the Constitution was so amended, on motion of Rev. J. S. Dill, as to read, "It shall be composed of delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members.

On motion, by Rev. J. S. Dill, article 6 of the Constitution was changed by inserting after the words State Missions, the words Home Missions, and after the words Ministerial Edu-

cation, the words Baptist Orphanage.

On motion, of Rev. J. T. Albritton, article 10 of the Constitution was amended by inserting after the words chosen, the words and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session.

On motion of Rev. J. T. Albritton, article 11 of the Constitution was so amended as to read. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a two-third vote of the

members present.

The Committee on Providence Church reported that the Church be received into the Association, and that Bro. Benj. Ward be recognized as a delegate from said church. The report was adopted, and the Moderator extended to Bro. Ward the right hand of fellowship.

The hour for the special order having arrived Rev. J. S. Dill read the report on Home Missions, and after being discussed by Revs. Battle, Dill and others, was adopted as fol-

lows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is located at Atlanta, Ga., with Dr. J. T. Tiehenor as

Secretary.

Its field embraces destitute sections in and adjacent to the Southern States. During the past year the Board has been doing work in Alabama, Mississippi, Maryland, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisana, Missouri, Texas, Tennessee, West Virginia, and Virginia, also in the Indian Territory and Cuba. The work has met with many tokens of Divine favor. There has been in the employ of the Board 328 missionaries, and the cash receipts, not including its cooperation work, have amounted the past year to \$69,398.00. The year's work shows the organization of 328 new churches, and the reception of 8402 new members.

The work in Cuba continues with great power, and the people of that island are being rapidly led to embrace a pure

gospel.

The purchase of a fine church property in the heart of the City of Havana places the work upon a high vantage ground

for the future.

The Home Board publishes a small eight page monthly called the "Home Field" which it offers at 25 cents a year. This is designed to set forth its special work and will give full information about each department. The Board also publishes a full line of S. S. Literature, the equal of any

offered to our schools, and we commend these to our churches.

In view of the increasing importance of this great work of Home Missions, and the great need of this Board, we recommend that the pastors of this Association give at least one Sunday in the year to the presentation of this cause to the people.

The Report on State Missions by Rev. J. T. Albritton, the Moderator, was read by Rev. J. S. Dill, and after being described by Bros. J. S. Dill, J. B. Harrell, and others was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Our corresponding Secretary of the Baptist State Convention well says of the sainted Meredith. "He was a seer in advance of his times." In his report on State Missions for the year 1835, having mentioned the discouraging fact, that of the five Missionaries who reported their work at that session of the Convention, but two had performed more than a few months' services. Meredith adds, "that efficient and successful measures in this department are of the more signal importance on account of the obvious fact, that on the success of our operations in this department depends, in a great measure, our success in each of the others."

State Mission Work is both defensive and aggressive. The civil, as well as the religious, interest of our people are in imminent hazzard from causes at work upon the very foundations of society, such as the evils of immigration, the schemes of the Romish hierarchy, and the forces of immor-

ality and infidelity.

While, therefore, we must push our aggressive work among the peoples of the earth so long as a nation remains in darkness, or a pagan is unclaimed from his idol; we must, with greater energy, if possible, push the home work 'till there shall be no longer a dark and waste place within the borders of our beloved State. We would urge the brethren forward by the two-fold consideration, that the prosecution of our State Mission work is not only the surest means of defence against the evils that environ us, but also the surest means of perpetuating, re-inforcing, and enlarging our Mission work abroad.

The Convention Minutes of 1835 show that there were but twenty-eight Associations in the State, and eight of these were opposed to Missions. The membership was about 30,000.

Now we have 86 Associations, 2325 Churches, 250,000 members, over 100 State Missionaries, and 30 representatives of

our North Carolina Churches in the foreign field.

If our history for the past half century teaches anything, it emphatically, teaches that the spirit of Missions is the spirit of Christ and is full of hope and life, while the spirit of Anti-Missions is the spirit of Anti-Christ, and is full of gloom and death.

Oh! that we may be more thoroughly imbued with this Mission, Christly spirit of hope and life! Respectfully JNO. T. ALBRITTON, } submitted.

In connection with the above report Bro. J S. Dill, introduced the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, that we earnestly call the attention of the new Executive Board to the 9th article of the Constitution, requiring the prosecution of our Associational Missions at their hands.

During the discussion of this resolution, the hour of adjournment came, and, on motion, the Association adjourned to meet at 1:30 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 130 o'clock, the Moderator called the Association to order.

The consideration of Bro. Dill's resolution was resumed and after being thoroughly discussed by a number of brethren, was adopted:

The Convention feeling that more must be done for God's cause than had been, entertained a motion by Bro. C. J. Nelson "that before the pledges and collections be taken that the Convention unite with Bro. Dill in earnest prayer. The Moderator called on Bro. We also commend to our brethren "Charity and Children," published at Thomasville in the interest of the Baptist Orphanage, at \$1.00 per year; also the "Foreign Mission Jonrnal," of Richmond, Va., "Our Home Field," of Atlanta, Ga., and the Baptist Sunday school papers and lesson helps published at Atlanta. Our Saviour in his last prayer for his disciples very earnestly prayed that they might be kept from the evil of the world. Recognizing intemperance to be an evil, destructive both of body and soul, we cannot too earnestly condemn it. We therefore recommend that our churches stand firmly by the Bible in opposing the use of ardent spirits as a beverage.

We earnestly urge every church in this Association to see to it that they have a Sunday School with the very best Superintendent they can get.

Fortunately, the time when arguments in favor of the scriptuality and advisability of Foreign Missions were needed, has, for the most part, passed away. The great need of the day is an appreciation of personal responsibility. Such idle questions as, "Can the heathen be saved without the gospel," have given place to enquiries after personal duty of the most serious import, "Can I in the light of Bible responsibility, be saved, if I do not send them the gospel?" "What does the Lord of the vineyard demand of me?"

Strange that during so many centuries after the master said "Go ye into all the world, the heart of Christendom was unstirred by, and its energies refused to respond to, the marching orders of the Divine captain! Truly upon us "The conds of the Ages are come," and a thousand million of heath-

ens are waiting to receive the gospel and usher in The Day of the Lord.

In response to signal providences, pointing to enlargement of plans. The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has greatly increased its missionary force, this, of course, entails a proportionate increase in contributions. Last year the Board received in round numbers \$100,000; this year, it must have \$150,000 to meet the necessities created by Jehovah's gracious providences.

North Carolina has won an honorable pre-eminent because of the noble men and women who have left her soil for heathen lands that "such as sit in darkness and in the shadow of death" might come to "the light of the glorious gospel of Christ." Let us not forget that those highly honored must

prove themselves worthy,

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Education is power. Proper education is power for good, a power which cannot be over-estimated. He who would have the greatest power for good must be educated. This will apply to denominations as well as to individuals. We, as Baptists, must not ignore the education of our people if we would expect the greatest power in uplifting the masses and

aggressively prosecute the work assigned us. This has renewed force when applied to our preachers, the teachers of the masses. An educated ministry is emphatically a demand of our times. The church which fails to furnish advantages for education to its clergy, must be supplanted by other churches, which acted more wisely in this particular.

At this time there is an urgent appeal to this body in behalf of the young men who are on the Board at Wake Forest College preparing themselves for the ministry. Two of these young men are from our midst. The committee would recommend the Education Board to this body, and urge for it a more liberal support than has been given it in the past.

Constitution of the Atlantic Baptist Association.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their own edification and

for the spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post office, delegates, and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund, other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued 'till the

church be recovered or dropped from this Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, cooperate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancements of its objects.

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's report of all receipts

and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time

of service and details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 2nd Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by

a two-thirds vote of the members present.

BY = LAWS.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches,

designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.

5. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without

permission.

7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited

to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State-Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by

"Mell's Parliamentary Practice."

11. The Report of the Executive Board, and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12. The General Order of Business shall be:

- 1. Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.
- 2. Election of officers.

3. Petitionary letters.

4. Appointments of committees for this session.

5. Appointment of standing committees.

- 6. Report of committees on churches delinquent at the previous session.
 - 7. Reports of standing committees.
 - 8. Reports of other committees.

9. Miscellaneous business.

Brethren of the Atlantic Association. This subject of Home Missions is one of great importance and should engage the attention of every Association in the State. We have now on the field, in the different States and Territories, 371 Missionaries; churches and stations, 1,182; baptisms, 4,477; received by letter, 3,621; total additions, 8,098; Sunday Schools organized, 336; teachers and pupils, 12,420; churches organized, 267; houses of worship built, 84; tracts distributed, 857,400; Bibles and Testaments, 5,728.

Our people have done a good work also among the negroes of the South, in the Indian Territory, and in Cuba. God be praised for such grand and glorious re-

sults. Let us, as a body of Christians, strive to do more for the cause of Christ in the future, than we have done in the past. Respectfully submitted,

THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

Kinston, North Carolina. Thursday, Oct. 30, 1890.

The Association was called to order by the Moderator at 10 o'clock. Rev. T. J. Baker conducted the religious exercises. *Proceedings of Tuesday and Wednesday read, corrected and adopted.

The Report on Foreign Missions was taken from the table and the discussion continued, after which the Report was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The past ten years in the history of the Foreign Board of the Southern Baptist Convention have been years of special growth and enlargement. God's richest blessings have rested upon his servants in their desire to obey, in cheerful toils, the great commission of our Divine Master. The work, as it now stands before us in the last report of our corresponding Secretary, presents the most gratifying results and the most encouraging prospects for the future.

The Board has now upon the field 78 foreign and 86 native workers. The amount received for the support of this work the past year was \$109,174.20.

Of the 78 foreign Missionaries in the employ of this Board, 19 have gone out from North Carolina. The

contributions from our State have been sadly disproportioned to such a call from God upon our men and women. It is gratifying, however, to note that certain Associations have become responsible for the support of a Missionary, and there are signs of increasing liberality to this great work. We earnestly urge that the Churches of the Atlantic Association catch the great spirit of missionary progress and enlargement that is abroad in the land in increasing their gifts to this Board.

The report on Sunday Schools was read by Bro. T. J. Eaton, and amended by Bro. Dill, and passed as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday School PROPERLY CONDUCTED is the hand-maid to religion; the nursery to the church. Solomon says, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." The object of the PROPERLY CONDUCTED Sunday School, is to teach

the child to keep the Sabbath day HOLY; to reverence GOD'S HOUSE; to read his WORD; to attend and pay good attention to the preaching of the Gospel; to serve God faithfully in this world, so that they may be happy in the world to come.

Brethren are our Sunday Schools doing their full duty and using all the means in their power to accomplish this great object? If they are, what a blessing to this world are the Sunday Schools, if they are not, what an awful mistake they are making, and what terrible results will follow. Brethren examine your own Sunday School. Is it properly conducted? If not, apply the proper remedy at once. May we all realize the importance of properly conducting our Sabbath or Sunday Schools.

Brother Dill's amendment:

We also commend to our churches the enlistment of every member of the church in the school. It not only is a place for the training of the children, but also a place for the study of the Word by adults—yea even by the aged. We therefore think that every church member has an appropriate place in the Sunday Schools.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Every one recognizes the evil of intemperance. Even unprofessing men acknowledge its evil. The only ques-

tion is how shall it be suppressed.

It is the opinion of your committee that every church member who visits bar-rooms ought to be instructed and impressed with the great evil he is doing himself and his church. Then deal with him, if no reform is seen.

We request each minister to preach, at least, one ser-

mon on the subject of temperance each year.

Your committee favors the adoption of a State Constitutional Amendment prohibiting the manufacture, sale, and importation of all intoxicating liquors.

B. F. DILLAHUNT, Chairman of Committee. On motion, the Report of the Finance Committee was adopted.

Moved and adopted, that \$6.08 be raised to supplement the Minute Fund.

Moved and adopted, that the Clerk be allowed \$10 for his services.

Constitution of the Atlantic Baptist Association.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an

additional delegate for every twenty-five members.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their own edification and for

the spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats

with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund, other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or

dropped from this Association.

longing to or entrusted to the body.

The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and prescrying minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds be-

The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to

them advisable for the advancements of its objects.

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and details of their work.

The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 2nd Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by a

two-thirds vote of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2- Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches, desig-

nating them as such.
3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right

The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his

successor all papers belonging to the body.

5. Members desiring to speak, shall first risc and address the Modcrator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without per-

mission.

7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to

seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.

, 10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by

"Mcll's Parliamentary Practice."

11. The Report of the Executive Board, and the Missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

4. Appointment of committees for this session.

Appointment of standing committees.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

The work in the Mission Field of this Association for the past year has had many encouraging features. New churches have been organized, destitute sections have been supplied, and a Colporter has been put in the field, and while we are made to feel some discouragement from the fact the ranks of our Missionary forces are to be broken by losing the services of our beloved brethren Baker, Alderman and Croeker, still we feel that the great work must be carried on, and we must therefore "Look to the Hills from whence cometh our help," and lay hold upon this work with the help of God and go forward the coming year resolved to do great things for Him and expect great things of Him.

J. C. Whitty Chairman Ex. Board.

The report on State Missions was read by Rufus Ford, and after being discussed by Bro. Whitty, Ford and others, was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your Committee to whom was referred the report on the work of the State Mission Board submit the following: This Board is the servant of our churches. It was formed for the purpose of eliciting, combining and directing the efforts of the denomination in building up the waste places in our own State.

Its past work has been such as to make us grateful to God, while its present and future work call for strong faith and enlarged liberality on

the part of all our churches.

This Board has employed the past year 118 Missionaries and expended \$16,500. Notwithstanding this great work, this Board could have greatly enlarged its work if it had had the means.

So important is the work of this Board that we consider it the means of

helping every other department of our work.

In contributing to State Missions we contribute to every other mission

of our connection.

The general claims of this Board are sufficient to call forth our liberal contributions and earnest prayers; but upon us, as an Association, it has special claims.

1. Because so many of our churches were founded and fostered by the Board.

2. Because so many of our weak churches are still helped by this Board. While we pay this past year \$1,075 to State Missions the Board pays us \$1,820.

3. Because this Board, while it failed by \$5,000 to give all the aid asked for by the destitution of the State, was liberal enough towards us to

give us all we asked.

In view of this general and special claim, and above all the claim which our Savior and Lord has upon us, let us, as an Association, increase our contributions and pray more carnestly for its success in the coming year than ever before. Respectfully submitted. Rufus Ford, Chairman.

The Lord is going to say to those who have helped in earing for these, "Inasmueh as ye have done it unto one of these least, ye have done it unto Me.", We suggest that each church in this Association take one collection this year for the orphans, and that the Sunday Schools take monthly collections for this worthy object. A collection was taken up amounting to twenty dollars, which was handed to J. D. Newton, who was representing the Orphanage.

The Report on Periodicals was read by J. C. Whitty, and after being discussed by brethren Caddell, Peterson and Whitty, was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

We cannot too strongly urge upon our brethren the importance of putting pure religious literature in their homes. Our boys and girls will read, and by all means let us do all in our power to see that everything is done to induce them to select the good and not the bad. We would therefore recommend the Biblical Recorder, as a denominational paper, it should have our hearty support, and no Baptist house should be without it; also Charity and Children, the organ of our Orphanage; The Foreign Mission Journal and Home Field which tell us of the great work of Missions of which we sadly need information. The Reports on Home and Foreign Missions were read by G. L. Finch and D. McLeod, and after being discussed by C. Durham and Rufus Ford, were adopted as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, Ga., has under its direction a work of vast importance, and it is accomplishing a great deal in the dissemination of the Gospel.

It has under its care 407 Missionaries working in the different States and Territories, comprising the S. B. Convention, and in Cuba. Of this number 17 are working in North Carolina.

The following statisties taken from the minutes of the last S. B. Convention will give some idea of the amount of work being done by this Board. Number of Missionaries, 407; religious services held, 53,980; religious visits, 67,634; baptisms, 5,349; received by letter, 4,638; churches constituted, 244; Sunday Schools organized, 424; houses of worship built, 143; pages of tracts distributed, 135,712; Bibles and Testaments furnished, 6,000.

We would call your attention especially to the work being done by this Board in Cuba. Churches suppplied, 6; other stations, 17; sermons and addresses, 1,325; weekly prayer meetings, 15; baptisms, 210; total mem-

bership, 1,917; religious visits, 3,125.

As we look over this grand Southland of ours we see that the field is already white unto the harvest, and the cry is for more men and more

money.

Then let us rise up to the full measure of our duty, brethren, and come to the aid of this Board with an enlarged contribution and thus help them to push forward the work committed to their charge.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission work is of such supreme importance that we need to be constantly reminded of duty in this direction and the necessity of zeal and renewed activity in prosecuting it.

God's richest blessings have rested upon our people in their desire to obey, and carry out the great commission and last command of our Divine

Lord.

The work as it now stands before us presents gratifying results and a very encouraging prospect-for the future. There are now in the employ of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention 69 Missionaries, and of this number 21 have gone from North Carolina. God has greatly honored us in calling so many of our brethren and sisters to this glorious work. But our contributions have been far below what they should have been. It is encouraging to note, however, that some of our Associations have become responsible for the support of a Missionary, and that there are signs of increased liberality among all the churches.

Your Committee would earnestly beg that the ehurches composing the Atlantic Association catch more of the Spirit of Missions, and, if possible, largely increase their contributions to this work. Respectfully submitted.



Constitution of the Atlantic Baptist Association.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their edification and for the

spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats

with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday of Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund, other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or

dropped from this Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors' shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds be-

longing to or entrusted to the body.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancements of its objects.

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and

details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 2nd Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by a

two-thirds vote of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches, desig-

nating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his

successor all papers belonging to the body.

5. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without per-

mission.

7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to

seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by

"Mell's Parliamentary Practice."

11. The Report of the Executive Board, and the Missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12. The General Order of Business shall be:

1. Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.

Election of officers.
 Petitionary letters.

4. Appointment of committees for this session.

5. Appointment of standing committees.

6. Report of committees on churches delinquent at the previous session.

7. Reports of standing committees.

8. Reports of other committees.

9, Miscellaneous business.

Your Committee respectfully recommend, That this body meet with the Baptist Church at Seven Springs, and that Rev. Rufus Ford preach the Introductory Sermon. Adopted.

The Report on the Baptist Orphanage was read by Rev. E. J. Edwards, and after being discussed by him and others, was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

The Orphanage is located at Thomasville, and is the property of the Baptists of North Carolina. At present there are one hundred and twenty-four children in the Orphanage. These children are dependent upon the good people of the State for food, clothes and education. They are the Lord's poor "he that pitieth the poor lendeth to the Lord." The Lord has laid this work upon our hearts, let us discharge our duty faithfully by supporting the Institution.

We recommend Charity and Children to the confidence and support of

the denomination.

We also recommend, That the churches of the Association take up a yearly collection for the support of the Orphanage, and that the Sunday Schools take up monthly collections, if practicable, for the same purpose.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Your committee, to whom was referred the duty of preparing a report on

Home Missions, submit the following:

The work of the Home Mission Board embraces five departments; the Indians, Negroes, English-speaking white people. Work among the Indians is mostly confined to the Indian Territory; while that in behalf of the colored people extends all over the South. Our foreign population under the care of this Board are those people like the Germans, who form such a large part of cities like St. Louis and Kansas City. States like Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, and Texas, have many of our own people who are our kindred according to the flesh; they need the help of older and better developed States. The island of Cuba, with its million and a half of inhabitants is a foreign field under the spiritual watch-care of this Board.

These five departments of Christian work, under the auspices of the Home Board, appeal to us for our sympathies, our prayers, and our contributions. This report would be too lengthy if your committee should mention only a few of the many reasons why each of these fields of work should be cultivated. The Indians of the West, the Negroes of the South, the foreigners in our midst, our own kindred who are rapidly building up new towns and new States, and the priest-ridden Cubans, each has a peculiar

claim upon us.

As a component part of the Southern Baptist Convention, we, as an Association, are committed to this work. As a body of regenerated men and women who are to witness for our Saviour in our own State, in adjourning

States more destitude than our own, and even to the uttermost parts of the earth, we are committed to this work. Not to give it our prayerful attention and our self-sacrificing contributions is to disobey a plain command, forfeit an exalted privilege, and miss the very genius of the gospel.

During the past Conventional year this Board has employed 335 mission-

During the past Conventional year this Board has employed 365 missionaries, who have organized nearly 200 new churches, and baptized over five thousand converts, and built nearly one hundred new houses of worship.

In view of what has been done; and in view of what remains to be done;

your committee recommend:

1. That the Pastors give their congregation, at least once a year, something of the history, properts and needs of Home Missions.

thing of the history, prospects and needs of Home Missions.

2. That each church, during this year make a special effort to, at least,

double the contributions for the year just closed.

3. That each church take stock in the "Permanent Fund," for building houses of worship.

If our Baptist people, young and old, are to be elevated in thought and have purer minds, they must read wholesome literature. The time has come when every Baptist-home ought to be filled with pure, moral toned, and religious literature. Our Baptist literature is admirably adapted to meet the needs of our people. The Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children ought to be in every Baptisthouse in this Association, so that our people may not only have pure-toned literature to read, but may be educated, along the lines of our denominational work in the State. And then we need the Foreign Mission Journal to give us information about our work on the Foreign Field. Nor would we forget the Home Field which informs us of the needs and work of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

We would also recommend the Sunday School Literature published at Nashville, Tenn., by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your committee feels that except the ministry of the Word, there is no department in our work of more importance and that will tell more for the glory of God and the salvation of souls, than the training of the young in the Sabbath Schools. We are glad to note the fact that most of the churches comprising this Association have Sunday schools, but it is deplorable that so few of the members of these churches are reported as being workers in these schools. It appears to your committee that some steps should be taken to get more of our people enlisted in the Sunday school work,

and as a means of bringing this about, we would recommend, First: The advisability of organizing in the bounds of this Association, a Sunday School Association, and if this shall be done, that a committee on time, place and programme for first session be appointed. Second: That our churches send out workers into the destitute sections near them and establish and look after all the mission schools possible during the coming year.

It also kills much of our Christian influence, and is a stumbling block to the world. We therefore most earnestly recommend, That some steps be taken by the Pastors and Churches of this Association to prohibit even the MODERATE use of it among our brethren.

The Report on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. J. H. Edwards, and after being discussed by brethren Edwards, Gwaltney, Brewer and Durham, was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

A crisis has been reached in the work of Foreign Missions. Nearly one-half of the Southern Baptist Convention year has passed, and only \$20.

402.98 has been received by our Foreign Board for the prosecution of a

work which will require, at least, \$120,000.

This is the case in the year during which we have planned as a denomination, to send out one hundred new missionaries, and to raise a Chapel Building Fund of \$125,000.

What is the cause of this apathy?

It is largely due to widely disseminated criticisms, not of the Board as such, but of the entire method of the work as now organized. This organized method is substantially that which came from the giant intellect of Wm. Carey, and has become the common heritage of all Evangelical Christians in their Foreign work. He delayed his going forth to India until he had organized a controlling Board in England, whose work should be to arouse the people at home to sustain the missionaries abroad.

Now at the expiration of one hundred years of organized effort, with its million and a half of converts won from heathenism, we are asked to disorganize and appeal to the churches to send out missionaries in an inde-

pendent way, without the intervention and guidance of a Board.

As an Association, we affirm our adherence to the Foreign Mission

Board, and our confidence in its methods.

We recommend to all our churches that they enlarge their Foreign Mission contributions in this emergency. If we, as Baptist, are to maintain our leadership in this work, we must know more about it, pray more for it, and give more to it.

We would recommend the revival of the monthly concert of Prayer for Missions, the formation of clubs to take and circulate the *Foreign Mission* Journal, and a persistent endeavor to secure, at least, one contribution from every member or our churches this year for Foreign Missions.

We recommend the organization of a Woman's Mission Society in every one of our churches where such a society has not yet been organized, and that the Sunday Schools be urged to give systematically to this object. Finally, we urge that every church in this Association shall make a Spec-

ial Centennial Offering to Foreign Missions during this year. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

We have in the Atlantic Association twenty churches, and about ten mission points, representing a membership of about 900, who depend upon the State and Associational Mission Boards for help. To help these points requires about eleven hundred dollars from the Associational Mission

Board which is supplemented by the State Board.

We find that the contributions have largely fallen behind that of last year which places the Board in an embarrassed condition. Pledges to the amount of \$925 were made at our last Association by the churches and individuals. Of this amount about \$560 has been paid, leaving a deficit of about \$365, the most of which we expect to gct. Having these facts before us, we recommend to the churches a more thorough organization of missionary effort. When we realize that just an average of one dollar each from the 2,150 members of the Baptist Churches of the Atlantic Association would give us almost double the amount needed to carry on this great and

important work, it makes us feel that all that is necessary, is to be thor-

oughly organized.

Will the pastors and consecrated laymen help us in this matter? We need pastors for the Pamlico, Wayne and 'raven county fields. We are receiving applications from preachers who are ready to take hold of this work, but not having the means with which to pay them, we can't say to them to come. Will God forgive us for this indifference? Brethren, stop and consider. Is it your duty to help in this work? Are you carrying out the Divine command of our blessed Lord and Saviour, when he said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel" by which people are saved. May God give us grace to do more for Him.

This work has been signally blessed. Witness some of our most prosperous churches, nurtured by this beneficence. Its employees have won thousands from the ranks of the enemy; its literature has wrought untold

good.

More than a hundred missionaries are now employed by the Board. The past year's work has been arranged on a basis of \$15,000. A much larger amount could be most profitably expended.

The outlook is promising; the field is ready for the siekle; laborers are anxious to reap the golden harvest; it remains for us to go up and possess

the land.

We urge our churches to cultivate sincere sympathy and engage in earnest prayer for this work, and generously answer its demands for large liberality.

OFFICERS OF THE ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ATLANTIC BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their edification and for the

spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats

with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6 Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's postoffice, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statisties; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund, other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the eause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or

dropped from this Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds be-

longing to or entrusted to the body.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, eo-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancements of its objects.

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and

details of their work.

The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 2nd Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by a two-

thirds vote of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches, desig-

nating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.

5. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall

observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission.

7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to

seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by

"Mell's Parliamentary Practice."

11. The Peport of the Executive Board, and the Missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12. The General Order of Business shall be:

1. Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.

Election of officers.
 Petitionary letters.

4. Appointment of committees for this session.

5. Appointment of standing committees.

6. Report of committees on churches delinquent at the previous session.

7. Reports of standing committees.8. Reports of other committees.

9. Miscellaneous business.

Jones in place of Rev. H. C. Moore, on Periodicals; C. J. Rivenbark in place of Dr. R. H. Lewis, on Sunday Schools.

Moved, That Bro. E. J. Edwards be allowed to present the claims of the Orphanage on to-morrow immediately after the Executive Committee's Report shall be disposed of.

Moved, That Rev. C. Durham be allowed to take up a collection after the Introductory Sermon to-night, to pay the debt now resting on this church.

The Committee on Devotional Exercises reported as follows: That the Association meet at 9:30 a.m. for prayer and praise to continue until 10 a.m. Adjourn at 12:30. Meet in afternoon at 2 p.m. and adjourn at pleasure. Meet at night at 7:30, and adjourn at will.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Your Committee to whom was referred the Report on Ministerial Edu-

cation submit the following:

We believe in a divine eall to the gospel ministry. No man takes this office upon himself, but as Paul says, Christ Jesus puts him into the ministry.

Once a man is called by The Spirit into this work, we believe that he should study to show himself approved unto God, a workman that needeth

not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of Truth.

In order that our young men who say they are ealled of God to this work, and who are approved by their respective Churches, may eultivate their minds, we, as a denomination, have organized an Educational Board whose duty it is to receive such brethren at Wake Forest College and help them in the matter of their education.

This Board has an history which we ask our brethren and sisters to examine and study. At present this Board is supporting thirty-five young brethren, and the only source of help to which it can look in order to carry

on this work is the money sent in by the churches.

The present need is very great—the most pressing since 1861. In the judgment of your Committee, if this work of Ministerial Education is allowed to suffer then we shall feel it in every department of our denominational work. We do not believe in an educational qualification for the Ministry, but we do believe in an Educated Ministry. If we are to hold our present exalted position among Christian denominations and keep pace with the sweeping progress of events then we must educate our young men or perish in our own prosperity. Financially, times are hard, but, denominationally, times will be harder if we neglect this all important work. Respectfully submitted,

We, your Committee, therefore, earnestly recommend that some steps be taken by the pastors and Churehes of this Association to prohibit even the moderate use of liquor among our brethren.

The Report on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. A. L. Stough, and after being discussed by brethren Stough, Ford, and Whitty was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The subject of Foreign Missions is well worthy, in itself, of our serious consideration, and especially appropriate to the occasion which assembles us here. We are here in the interest of the Church which has enlisted the noblest attributes of God himself, and cost the greatest sacrifice that heav-

en could make. The Church that was instituted among men and designed for the conversion of the world. This is the great object of her establishment, the first and leading business of her organization Matt. 28:19-20.

The Apostles were Missionaries, and the Church as a Missionary institution prayed for their success, supported them, and had the Church continued in this good work, the banner of the gospel would now be waving triumphantly over the entire habitable globe. How strange after the lapse of so many years since the Church was organized to find so many of our people have yet to learn that the heathen are lost without the gospel, and that the obligation to give the gospel to the heathen is laid upon us, by the command of the Lord Jesus Christ. Perhaps what is needed more than anything else, is faith,—Faith in God—Faith in his promises—Faith in the great Head of the Church—Faith in Missions—faith in our Boards of Missions.

How can we be so faithless? Why we have everything to encourage and urge us on in the work of Missions. The wants of a dying world, the nature of the gospel, the principle of benevolence, the pledge of success, the seal of God upon all past efforts, and the cheering aspect of enterprise that honors God, and blesses man, an enterprise in which Angels might wish to bear an humble part, the progress of which is intensely engaged upon all the good on earth, and all the perfected in glory, and the completion of which will fill the world with songs of blessedness, and beaven with shouts of triumph. Then let us stand up like men, upon whom the vows of God rest, to whom the eyes of perishing millions are directed, and whose hearts have taken hold on the interests of eternity, and then do as Christ's Conscience would have us, then shall our fervent spirits enjoy communion with the Father of Spirits, and prepare us to join the general assembly of the saved, where they shall be gathered together in glory from the North, from the South, from the East and the West, from the four winds of heaven.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The work of the Home Mission Board embraces all the territory occupied by the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Island of Cuba besides. In this vast field, there are more than 20,000,000 people. In round numbers, 7,000,000 of these are negroes, 1,500,000 Cubans, and 60,000 Indians.

As facts are said to be the fingers of God, the following statistics are submitted, taken from the last report of the Board, showing the work of the Board for the past Conventional year.

that in Cuba has been phenomenal.

Among the white people, embracing an ever increasing foreign population, the beneficent fruits of the Board have been felt in all the States. Perhaps no field on earth more loudly calls for our prayers and our means, and none that promises a richer harvest. REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee is delighted to report that within the past year renewed energy has come into this branch of the ministry of the Word. The people as they have obeyed the word and teachings of the Holy Spirit have aroused us to the importance of this work. From the annexed comparative table 1875 to 1893 it will be observed that North Carolina stands third in attendance upon S. S. Delaware and Florida taking the lead. This is encouraging to us as North Carolinians, but when we take into considerations that within our borders there is quite four hundred thousand children between the ages of six and twenty that do not attend our Schools, the situation is appalling and calls for the best efforts of our most consecrated.

people. Visit our Sunday Schools and as you look into the faces of those gathered there we fail to see the boys and girls of 16 to 25 and the men and women of 30 to 60—where are they and why are they not there? The boys and girls of 16 to 25 have gone to the world because they were not led to God earlier and the men and women of mature years have grown too old to teach and disciple the nations, but are not themselves too old to go to Heaven. Awake thou that sleepest and be converted; there is a work for you to do. In this work there are three things that confront us; viz. First, Is it well with the child? Second, What manner of child shall this child be? Third, Is the young Absolem safe?

The Sunday School like the prayer meeting is no side issue, but is a should be the life of the Church. The Lord puts good timber into our hands, and we need, as officers and teachers, men and women who love and fear God; men and women who are believers and not professors only; men and women that are indeed alive to the welfare of souls. We would recommend that every Sunday School organize a Teachers' meeting for we need to heed Paul's injunction to Timothy, "Study to show thyself approved unto God. A workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." 2 Tim. 2:15. We would further recommend that the Sunday School be made an object of special prayer at the Church services and around the family altar and that our pastors take a greater interest in this work of saving souls. Help us, Deut; 31:12 "Gather the people together, men, and women, and children, and thy stranger that is within thy gates, that they may hear, and that they may learn, and fear the Lord your God, and (observe) to do all the words of this law; and that their children, (which have not known anything) may hear, and learn to fear the Lord your God."

CONSTITUTION

——OF THE——

Atlantic Baptist Association.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their edification and for the spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's postoffice, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minnte Fund, Other Objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the canse; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or dropped from this Association.

8 The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, an Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among the members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, the Historian in recording and reporting such Associational historical facts as are worthy of preservation, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to entrusted to or the body.

9 The Annual Sessions of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 2nd Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

10. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by a two thirds vote of the members present.

By - Laws.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches, designating them as such.
- 3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.
- 4. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.
- 5. The Historian shall record and report at each Association such Associational historical facts as are worthy of preservation.
- 6. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.
- 7. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission.
 - 8. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.
- 9. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.
- 10. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board; also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.
- 11. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by "Mell's Parliamentary Practice."
 - 12. The General Order of Business shall be:
 - 1. Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.
 - 2. Election of officers.
 - 3. Petitionary letters.
 - 4. Appointment of committees for this session.
 - 5. Appointment of standing committees.
 - 6. Report of committees on churches delinquent at the previous session.
 - 7. Reports of standing committees.
 - 8. Reports of other committees.
 - 9. Miscellaneous business.

Moved, That the Moderator appoint a Committee to recommend changes and additions to the Constitution and

By-Laws of this Association.

In accordance with the above motion, the Moderator appointed the following brethren members of said Committee: C. A. Jenkins, R. D. Carroll and W. T. Jones.

R. D. Carroll, pastor of this Church, extended a hearty welcome to all delegates and visiting brethren. C. Durham responded in behalf of the Association.

The Moderator appointed the following as Committee on

exercises: A. L. Stough and B. F. Dillahunt.

The Moderator appointed A. D. Hunter, Chairman of Committee on Periodicals and Religious Literature, and

John Mitchell on Ministerial Education.

The Committee on Religious Exercises reported the fellowing order: 7:30 a.m. Prayer and Praise; 10 a.m. the Association will meet; adjourn at 12:30 p. m. Re-assemble at 2 p. m.; adjourn at pleasure. Night session 7:30 and adjourn at will.

The report on Ministers' Relief Board was read by R. D. Carroll, and after being discussed was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON MINISTERS' RELIEF BOARD.

The Baptist Ministers' Relief Board is located at Durham, N. C. Its object is to afford aid and relief to needy Baptist Ministers, and needy widows of Baptist Ministers, who have given their lives to the work of the gospel ministry, and have thus remained poor in this world's goods.

The business of this Board is conducted strictly upon a cash basis. No debts are at any time contracted, or aid voted to any one, unless there is

money in the Treasury to pay the same.

No officer of this Board receives any compensation for services rendered,

except actual expenses for attending to the business of the Board.

This Board now has a "Permanent Interest Bearing Fund" of about six hundred dollars, with which one-third of all amounts collected by the Churches is invested; the interest on this Fund with the remaining twothirds collected by the Churches, goes for the support of Beneficiaries.

The Corresponding Secretary of the Board says "what is needed now, is

more of the needy ones on the Board. Doubtless there are many in the State who are greatly in need of aid, but who know nothing of the provisions of this Board. The reason for this, is, our people have not paid proper attention to this class of our Ministers, and to this department of our work."

Doubtless if there was some one from the Atlantic Association on this Board it would stir the brethren and Churches within our bounds to more liberal giving. We would urge the importance of looking up the needy ones in our own Association, if there are any, that they may be reported to this Board and receive its aid.

There is not a Beneficiary on this Board from this entire Association, and there are thirty-four Associations in the State that have not a Beneficiary on the Board. Is it possible that there are none in these Associations that

are as needy as those on the Board?

While we seek to enlarge the contributions, we ought to be equally inter-

ested in finding THOSE WHO ARE IN NEED.

There are now six old Brethren on the Board with their families, and three widows of deceased ministers. Four of these Brethren have only wives to care for; one of them has a wife and three children, and one with a wife and one child. All the widows have children; one with one child; one with four daughters; and one with four or five little children. The Board is very strict about receiving and retaining applicants. At this time

there is only one applicant—a widow from Eastern Association.

During the Conventional year up to June 4th, only \$127.50 have been appropriated. The Treasurer of the Convention reports only about \$227 collected since the Convention. Shall we not stir ourselves up to a more faithful discharge of our duty in this work? Shall we allow our brethren to stand in the thickest of the battle till their strength fails them and then leave them to suffer in their old age? Shall they minister to us Spiritual things and we refuse to minister to them carnal things? Shall we muzzle the mouth of the ox that treadeth out the corn? Let every one lay by him on the first day of the week as the Lord prospers him, that a collection may be given to those poor Saints once every year.

Your Committee would recommend that the pastors of this Association bring this matter before their Churches once a year, and that a collection R. D. CARROLL, Chairman. be taken for this Board.

The Committee on Constitution and By-Laws reported through C. A. Jenkins as follows:

REPORT ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

Your Committee recommend that Article 8 of Constitution be amended as follows: The word and before the words Treasurer shall be emitted, and the words and an Historian shall be inserted between treasurer and

clected. Article 8 as amended will read as follows:

The Officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, an Historian and a Treasurer elected annually by ballot from among its Members to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, the Historian in recording and reporting, at each Association, such Associational historical facts as arc worthy of preservation and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

The same Committee reported as follows on By-Laws: The following By-Law shall be inserted between numbers 4 and 5 of the present By-Laws: The Historian shall record and report, at each Association, such Associational historical facts as are worthy of preservation.

Association adjourned to meet at 2 p. m.

FIRST DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association was called to order at 2 o'clock p. m. by the Moderator. Prayer by J. H. Lambeth.

The report on Temperance was read by W. T. Jones and after being discussed was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The liquor business like a monster devil fish, fastens its tentacles upon the powers of State and then proceeds with its work of ruin. If allowed an existence, at once, its promoters essay to make the laws of State minister to their gain. If established, we can never estimate the half of its destructive work. Granted an existence, it defies the laws of God and of the State whenever an opportunity is presented. To engage in it, is to become a moral outlaw against God and man.

How is it to be throttled?

The tear stained cheeks of wives and mothers and children, aye, the voice of millions of people cursed by rum, is lifted against this business. The drunkard's grave and the drunkard's hell bid us fight against it. Let us preach against it; pray against it; and vote against it. Let our Churches have a high temperance standard before them. Be it ours ever to discountenance dram drinking on the part of Church members. Let our people in no way be participators in this blood business, either by drinking of liquors or in any way countenancing their sale.

All our people should read the Biblical Recorder. It is sound in its matter and progressive in its policy. It has been a great power in the development of all our denominational interests. It is ably edited, and has a large number of able contributors.

We also endorse *Charity and Children*, our Orphanage paper and our own Sunday-school literature published by our Southern Sunday-School Board at Nashville, Tenn., also the *Foreign Mission Journal and Home Field*. We recommend that our Churches and Sunday-schools buy this literature from our supply store in Paleigh.

SECOND DAY-Morning Session.

The Association met at 9:30 a. m. for devotional exercises led by John Mitchell. At 10 o'clock a. m., the Moderator called the Association to order.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

This branch of our Mission work embraces the territory of our Southern Baptist Convention and Cuba The work may be divided into five departments:

1 In Cuba.

2. Among the Indians.

3. Among the Foreign Population,4. Among our Native White People.

5. Among the Colored Race.

During the last Conventional year it employed 381 Missionaries; Baptized 4,470; Constituted 133 Churches; and established 429 Sunday schools. It had 14 Missionaries laboring in our State, 5 in the bounds of our Convention and 9 in Western North Carolina. They baptized 149 souls.

Receipts and expenditures of the Board amounts to some over \$100,000 per year, North Carolina contributes about \$2500. Its last report shows a debt of \$6,500. This work is highly worthy of your support. In connection with its mission work it publishes *The Home Field* at 25 cents per year. It should be in every Baptist family.

Your Committee looking over the field assigned them, find that the ground has been thoroughly canvassed by former Committees in regard to the machinery of the Sabbath School and the qualifications of its officers and teachers, so that there is no need of any further report in this direction.

CONSTITUTION OF THE

Atlantic Baptist Association.

This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist

Association."

It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their edification and for the spread of the Gospel according to our faith

and order.
4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve Gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or ad-

vice of the Association.

Each church shall send to the Aesociation, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post-office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses. Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund, Other Objects.
7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual

session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued 'till the church be recovered or dropped

from this Assocsation.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, an Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among the members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, the Historian in recording and reporting such Associa-tional historical facts as are worthy of preservation, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

The Annual Sessions of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 2nd Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a mojority

of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

10. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by a two thirds vote of the members present.

BY - LAWS.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their

churches, designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to

them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.

The Historian shall record and report at each Association such Associational historical facts as are worthy of preserva-

6. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

Members shall not absent themselves from the session

without permission.

8. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and ab-

sentees marked.

9. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

10. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of

the State Mission Board; also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, and one to Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville.

11. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by "Mell's Parliamentary Practice."

- 12. The General Order of Business shall be:
- Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.

Election of officers. Petitionary letters.

Appointment of committees for this session.

Appointment of standing committees.

FIRST DAY-MORNING.

KINSTON BAPTIST CHURCH, LENOIR COUNTY, N. C.

Kinston, N. C. October 15th, 1895.

The Atlantic Baptist Association met in its Twelfth Annual Session with Kinston Baptist Church. Rev. Rufus Ford, the Moderator, being absent, Brother C. J. Nelson moved that Brother J. C. Whitty open the Association. After a short talk by Brother Whitty, prayer by Brother Nelson and song by the choir.

Dr. R. H. Lewis, of Kinston, was appointed Moderator and L. L. Leary, of Morehead City, Clerk protem. The choir then rendered "Stand Up for Jesus" very beautifully, after which the Moderator appointed Brethren Jackson and Hackney as Reading Clerks.

Association adjourned to meet at 2.30 p. m.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association was called to order by the Moderater at 2.30. Prayer by Rev. D. McLeod, of Washington. The delegates from the new churches were called forward and the Moderator of the Association extended to them the right hand of fellowship.

Report on Periodicals was read and after being discussed by Brethren Caddell and Peterson, was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

It is the duty of every member of our organization to become acquainted, as far as possible, not only with the persons composing it, but also with the means used in carrying out its objects. The best means by which a Baptist can perform this duty is to subscribe to a Baptist newspaper, published in the State. The amount of the subscription money is a trifle of utterly insignificant importance, compared with the vast amount of much needed information gathered from the columns of a religious journal each year. We recommend to the Baptists of the Atlantic Association the Biblical Recorder, published at Raleigh, N. C.; the N. C. Baptist, published at Fayetteville, N. C.; and Charity and Children, published at the Orphanage at Thomasville, N. C.

DR. R. H. LEWIS, B. J. WARD. Committee.

Report of Minister's Relief Board was read by Rev. J. W. Rose, and after being duly discussed was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF MINISTERS' RELIEF BOARD.

This board is located at Durham, N. C., with Rev. W. C. Tyre President, and Rev. J. F. McDuffie Corresponding Secretary. Its object is to aid Baptist ministers that have given

their life to the preaching of the Gospel of Christ and in old age are poor and unable to take care of themselves. Also to aid the widows of Baptist ministers who are left in needy circumstances. One-third of the contributions made to this object is invested as a permanent or endowment fund; so it hopes to be self-sustaining some day. The board has been in operation about four years. It has given aid to twenty-one beneficiaries. Eight have died. Two widows have married; leaving eleven now depending on the Board for support. The receipts this year have been far behind that of last year. Last year, receipts were \$1,187.58. This year, receipts to date are \$272.07. One man gave \$500 last year. This year very few have given \$5.00.

Your committee recommends that the pastors bring this object before the churches at least once a year, giving them an opportunity to contribute to its support. The officers of the Board will be glad to receive any information concerning old Baptist ministers or widows of Baptist ministers who are in

need of help.

J. W. Rose, Committee.

After report was adopted a collection was taken for the Board amounting to \$7.62.

Report on Constitution and By-Laws was read by Rev. C. S. Burgess and after being discussed for some time Rev. J. T. Jenkins moved that the report be laid over until to-morrow morning when missions are taken up. Motion carried,

Association adjourned to meet at 7.15 p. m.

FIRST DAY-NIGHT SESSION.

The Moderator called the Association together at 7.15 p. m., and Rev. James Long, of Goldsboro, preached the introductory sermon, which was very instructive and entertaining.

SECOND DAY-Morning Session.

The Association met at 9.30 a. m. for devotional exercises, conducted by Rev. J. T. Jenkins. At 10 o'clock the Moderator called the Association to order.

Minutes of the first day's proceedings were read and

adopted.

The Moderator welcomed visiting brethren: Frank Hancock, representing Hobgood Female Seminary at Oxford; C. Durham, representing State Missions, Home Missions and Sunday Schools.

Report of Committee on Ministerial Education was read by Rev. B. W. Spillman and after discussion was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION:

We believe in education. Our history shows it. We commend to our churches our Baptist College at Wake Forest. This is its most prosperous year, there being already 236 students enrolled. The Baptists of North Carolina ought to give Wake Forest a liberal endowment. The Board of Education is now supporting thirty-five young men, preparing for the ministry. It is God's work. Let us support it.

We rejoice at the progress made on our Female University. We heartily approve the great work being done for our Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

We rejoice at the establishment of many Baptist High

Schools in North Carolina.

We recommend to the Baptist State Convention that a committee be appointed to take into consideration the early establishment of a medical college in the city of Raleigh, to be in organic connection with Wake Forest College.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association was called to order at 2,30 p. m. by the Moderator. Prayer by Brother Frank Hancock. On motion a committee was appointed to nominate an Excutive Board. A. G. Cox, B. W. Spillman, J. T. Jenkins, Jas. Long and J. M. Wooten were the committee appointed. By motion the appointing of delegates to State Convention was left with the Moderator. S. J. Porter, T. D. Hackney, C. S. Burgess and J. W. Rose were committee appointed.

On motion by Rev. C. J. Nelson it was ordered that any member in good standing who might be in attendance at the State Convention should be considered as a delegate antil our limit is full.

Moved by J. C. Whitty that Rev. B. W. Spillman be appointed delegate to Southern Baptist Convention and Jas. Long, of Goldsboro, alternate.

Report on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. S. J. Porter, and after being earnestly and ably discussed by himself and C. Durham, it was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Since Christ came into the world to seek and to save that which was lost, He may be considered in the loftiest sense, the first great Foreign Missionary. And that He wishes us to take up and carry forward the mission work inaugurated by Himseif, is evident from His final commandment to His desciples: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Anticipating the difficulties and discouragements that would attend obedience to the command, He makes this assertion and promise as a basis for encouragement and help: "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth". And again: "Lo I am with you always, even unto the end of the age." Because of our desire and efforts to obey this injunction of our Lord, we are termed Missionary Baptists, an appellation of

which we might well afford to be proud, were we really mis-

sionary in spirit as well as name.

In order that our people may have some idea of the extent and efficiency of our Foreign Mission Board, we give the following summary: The Southern Baptist Convention was organized in Augusta, Ga., in 1845. At that meeting the Foreign Mission Board was appointed. During the 50 years of its existence, 310 missionaries have been sent out, \$1,814,800 given for the work. We now have missionaries in China, Africa, Japan, Italy, Mexico, and Brazil.

The report to the Convention which met in Washington

May 10th to 14th, 1895, shows the following statistics:

China Missions—41 missionaries, 25 native helpers, 16 churches, 1,131 members, 118 baptisms, contributions, \$2,017.35. Africa Missions—7 missionaries, 6 native helpers, 4 churches,

239 members, 67 baptisms, \$214.45 contributions, Japanese Missions—6 missionaries, 5 native helpers, 1

church, 40 members. 9 baptisms, \$20.74 contributions.

Missions—3 missionaries, 28 native helpers, 18 churches, 353 members, 28 baptisms, \$357.25 contributions.

Mexican Missions—20 missionaries, 19 native helpers, 32 churches, 1,120 members, 226 baptisms, 3 schools, \$1,817.38 contributions.

Brazilian Missions—14 missionaries, 6 native helpers, 14

churches, 610 members, 133 baptlsms, \$2,400 contributions.

It is seen that during the past year there has been a comparatively large number of baptisms and that from the contributions the native churches on the mission fields are being trained to support themselves.

The churches of the Atlantic Association are requested to

contribute during the present conventional year \$300.

Let the pastors and brethren take the matter in hand and see that this amount is raised. Brethren, this is God's work, and He calls upon us to help in giving the gospel of His Son to S. J. PORTER. the lost nations of the earth. W. G. BRITT,

Report was adopted as follows.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

This means Mission work in the bounds of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. The Convention is divided into 45 Associations. The State Mission work is operated by the Board of Missions located at Raleigh, N. C., co-operative with the executive committees of the several Associations in the bounds of our convention.

We have 92 missionaries on the field this year. Eight are doing work in the bounds of our Association. Yet there is much destitution unrelieved. The basis of State Mission work this year is \$15,000. Only about one third of that amount has been raised to date. We haven't quite two months to raise the other \$10,000. If this amount is not raised the Missionaries will have to go unpaid. Has the Atlantic Association done her will have to go unpaid. Has the Atlantic Association done her part in this matter? Last year her churches contributed between seven and eight hundred dollars to this work. She has about three times that many members. That would be 33½ cts. per member. How does this compare with Bro. Porter's statement that the Brazilian Baptist give \$12.00 per annum? Let every member of each church in this Association double their contributions to this object the coming year.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission work is probably the most perplexing problem with which we have to do. The teritory is large, embracing the Southern Baptist convention and Cuba. Here we have to do with more different characters, grades and classes of people than in any other department of our work. We have to work among the colored people, the Indians, foreign population, native whites and Cubans. The Home Mission Board has done a great work in this territory and is doing more this year than during its past history; 425 missionaries, an increase of 44 since last year. Baptised 5,921, an increase of 1,451 over last year. Collections this year \$88,640.20, being over \$13,000 larger than last year. The increase of missionaries over last year has been about 12 per cent. Receipts 20 per cent. Baptisms, 33 per cent.

Report of Committee on Petitionary Letters recommending Swansboro Baptist Church for membership in the Association was adopted.

R. D. CARROLL, M. D. LANE, R. W. HAYWOOD,

On motion of J. C. Whitty the Church was received

into the fellowship and the delegates admitted into the membership of the Association. Bro. J. C. Whitty stated that Rev. S. J. Porter who was appointed to preach the Introductory Sermon would be here this evening on the freight train. that he had been detained to preach a funeral.

In behalf of the Association the Moderator extended the right hand of fellowship to the new delegates from Swansboro Church.

Committee on Order of Service reported as follows: Meet at 2 p. m. this evening, adjourn at pleasure. Special order for this evening, Education and Ministers Relief Board. Meet to-night at 7 o'clock for Introductory Sermon by Rev. S. J. Porter. Meet Wednesday at 9 a. m., for Devotional Exercises; Association come to order at 9:30 a. m. Special order: Associational Missions, Colportage and Church Extension Funds.

Rev. B. W. Spilman moved that the report on State Missions and Sunday Schools be made together by one committee. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned until 2 p. m. Benediction by Rev. J. P. Spence.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Moderator called the Association to order at 2:30 p. m. Rev. B. W. Spilman moved that the report on Education be special order for Wednesday at 2 p. m. Motion carried.

On motion the report on Ministerial Relief Board be heard. The Committee was not present, and on motion of Bro. Jas. Long the last year's report be read and supplemented with this year's statistics; motion carried and the report was read as follows:

REPORT OF MINISTERS RELIEF BOARD.

This Board is located at Durham, N. C., with Rev. W. C. Tyre, President, and Rev. J. F. McDuffle, Corresponding Secretary. Its object is

to aid Baptist ministers that have given their life to the preaching of the Gospel of Christ and in old age are poor and unable to take care of themselves. Also to aid the widows of Baptist ministers who are left in needy circumstances. One-third of the contributions made to this object is invested as a permanent or endowment fund; so it hopes to be self sustaining some day. The Board has been in operation about five years. There are now ten dependent upon the Board for support. The receipts this year have been about \$500.00. This is an increase over last year. Your committee recommends that the pastors bring this object before the churches at least once a year, giving them an opportunity to contribute to its support. The officers of the Board will be glad to receive any information concerning old Baptist ministers or widows of Baptist ministers who are in need of help.

S. J. PORTER, Committee.

The report was discussed by Rev. Jas. Long, Rev. J. T. Jenkins, J. C. Whitty, Dr. John Mitchell and Rev. B. W. Spillman and adopted.

Bro. J. B. Olive moved that we take a cash collection now, and also take promises from the delegates to try to raise a certain amount the coming year for the Ministers Relief Board; motion carried and the collection was taken amounting to \$6.16.

NIGHT SESSION.

The Association met at 7 p. m., and Rev. S. J. Porter preached the Introductory Sermon from the 20th verse of the 17th chapter of John.

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

WEDNESDAY, Oct. 14.

Association met at 9 a. m., for devotional exercises, conducted by Bro. John E. Ray. At 9:30 the Moderator called the Association to order. Minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and adopted. Roll of delegates was then called.

The Moderator welcomed visiting brethren as follows: Rev. J. E. White, Corresponding Secretary Baptist State Convention, representing State Missions, &c.; Brother John E. Ray, representing the Deaf, Dumb and Blind Institute of Raleigh; Bro. O. T. Smith, representing the "Biblical Recorder;" Bro. J. B. Newton, Colporter from West Chowan Association.

On motion the regular order for this hour was deferred 40 minutes for report on Periodicals. The report was read as follows by Bro. A. G. Cox:

We feel proud of our organization and of its workings in education and giving the gospel to perishing souls, and caring for the homeless orphans together with other work too tedious to mention. In order that we be true to our organization and to each other we should become acquainted not only with each other, but with the entire working of our body. We can get such information from the Biblical Recorder (which is the organ of the Association) the N. C. Baptist, Charity and Children and The Foreign Mission Journal, and we urge upon our membership to make at least one of the above named papers their companion.

A. G. COX, Committee.

After being ably discussed by Brethren Smith, Peterson, Jenkins, Mathews, White and Rose, the report was adopted.

On motion State Missions was dispensed with for the present and Ministerial Education taken up. Brother Spilman read the report on Education as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

1. The first object of the Baptist State Convention, as stated in its conscitution, is the Education of Baptist Preachers. This work is committed to a Board located at Wake Forest College. The purpose is to assist poor young preachers who would be unable otherwise to obtain an education. We should assist in this work because an education is helpful to do effective service; because God often calls poor men to be

preachers; becauses the lives of the men thus helped by the churches prove the wisdom of the work. The churches are now aiding at Wake Forest College twenty-two young preachers. Many worthy ones can

not now be helped for lack of funds.

2. Wake Forest College has claims upon us which we cannot ignore. In the lives of the men who through more than sixty years have left its walls, in the work that they have done in the work now being done at the College we see the reasons for its continued existence and prosperity. This is its most prosperous year. Already there are 245 students enrolled. The new school of the Bible under the direction of Prof. W. R. Cullom is a desirable addition.

3. The Female University is not yet completed. The building has ceased for lack of funds. It is hoped that it may soon be complete in

buildings and have a liberal endowment.

4. We believe that for the good of the student, the institution and the State that the voluntary principle in education should be put in practice in all educational institutions.

B. W. SPILMAN.

The report was discussed by Brethren Dr. John Mitchell, J. E. Ray, Rev. Benj. Ward and Rev. W. F. Fry.

Bro. Fry stated that Bro. N. L. Gaskins was a member of Truitt Church and was called of God to preach the Gospel but had not the means to educate himself, and the Board of Education was unable to assist him now.

Brethren W. F. Fry, R. D. Carroll, J. W. Rose, S. J. Porter and J. M. Alderman each pledged themselves to pay for one month's board for Bro. Gaskins, either at Bro. Fry's School or at Wake Forest. On motion the report was adopted.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Moderator called the Association together at 2 p. m. Prayer by Bro. J. C. Whitty.

Committee on Petitionary Letters reported, recommending Oregon Baptist Church for admittance into the Association.

> R. D. CARROLL, M. D. LANE. Committee.

The report was received and on motion the church was received as a constituent part of this body. The Moderator extended the right hand of fellowship to the delegates of this church in behalf of the Association.

The report of the Executive Committee and Colportage was read by Rev. J. T. Jenkins and Rev. S. J. Porter.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE AND COLPORTAGE.

This Executive Board was appointed by this Association last year. We organized by electing Brethren Samuel J. Porter, chairman, and J. T. Jenkins, Secretary.

The Board mapped out some territory which we could occupy at that time by the service of six missionaries, namely: Rev. R. D. Carroll at Smyrna, Davis and Marshallburg; Rev. J. W. Rose at LaGrange, Snow Hill, Castoria, Seven Springs, Union and Fort Barnwell; Rev. C. J. D. Parker at Pollocksville, Piney Grove, Spring Garden, Maysville, Cove, Truitt and Trenton; Rev. J. W. Nobles at Enon, Piney Grove, Capernaum, Christian Hope, Bear Creek and North East; Rev. W. F. Fry at Bayboro, Vaudemere, Bay Creek and Oregon; Rev. Benj. F. Ward at Swansboro, Cool Springs, Sanders Store and Bogue Banks. Brother Carroll has had 22 additions to his churches during the period of nine months, and one meeting to hold soon. Brother Rose has received fifteen on his field in nine months, three meetings to hold soon. Brother Parker occupied his field eight months and had fifty additions. Brother Nobles has had thirty-five additions; Brother Fry has had

twelve additions and one of his churches, Bayboro, has withdrawn from the Board and is self sustaining. Bro. Ward has had three additions to his churches. The total number received into the churches during the year, in our mission work, is 137.

Brother Simpson, our Colporter, has preached regularly at Piney Point, Linches Bridge and Woodville. Bro. C. B. Paul did some

preaching in addition to Colportage work.

We have several other important points which need occupying, but

we lack funds with which to put goodmen in the field.

At the Union meeting in the Tabernacle Church, Newbern, last December, it was voted to appoint a committee on Colportage and money was pledged to put a Colporter in the field. Rev. E. B. Simpson was selected. At the Union at Vandemere it was voted to add another Colporter. Rev. C. B. Paul was selected.

The report was spoken on by Rev. B. W. Spilman and adopted.

Report on State Missions and Sunday Schools was read by Rev. R. D. Carroll as follows:

STATE MISSIONS AND SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

State Missions is probably the most important work before North Carolina Baptists at the present day. Upon its success depends the prosperity of all our other denominational enterprises. Very much of the strength which we now possess as a denomination has come to us through the State Mission work. There are 94 Baptist preachers employed by the State Mission Board this year. These give a part or all of their time to Mission work. Only 34 of these men labor in the Eastern part of the State; while 24 of them labor in the middle section and 36 in the Western part of the State.

These Missionaries are located in thirty Associations, and preach to between 400 and 500 congregations. Several of these brethren have been doing Mission work in the bounds of this Association. What the Board sends back to us is more than this whole Association raises for

State Missions.

Faithful work is being done by all of these brethren, and it is hoped that at each of these points at an early day there will be a self sustaining church in full sympathy with the work and contributing liberally to its support. The Convention in Greensboro authorized the expenditure of \$15,000 this year. In the Treasurer's report of October 7th, only \$4,828.98 is asknowledged.

Brethren we appeal to you to rally to the support of this work upon which half of our interests are based. Three weeks now remain and the books will be closed. During this time much earnest work must be done, or the cause will suffer. The cause of Christ, dear to every loyal Baptist, must not lag or falter. North Carolina for truth, for Christ and the Glory of God is our motto.

We urge upon all the churches of this Association to rally to the support of State Missions this year, and not to tire in their zeal until all the destitution in our bounds have been supplied with the Gospel of Christ.

The Sunday School work has for many years been a department of work under our Board of Missions and Sinday Schools. Its importance is a recognized fact among all intelligent Baptists. At our last State Convention the Sunday School and Colportage department of our work was placed under the direction of a committee of fifteen members of the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools and a man was selected who took the oversight of this work April 1st. The work of this committee is to see to it that there is a well equipped Baptist Sunday School opened fifty two Sundays in each year within reach of every individual

The added expense of this work is paid by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the State Convention. In connection with this work the Baptists own and operate the Baptist Book Store, of Raleigh. This store is prepared to fill at publisher's prices all orders for Sunday School Literature, Bibles, Sunday School supplies and books of any sort. All profits go to help on the work.

In connection with this work Sunday School Institutes are held

wherever an opportunity presents.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission work is probably the most perplexing problem with which we have to do. The territory is large, embracing the Southern Baptist Convention and Cuba. Here we have to do with more different characters, grades and classes of people than in any other department of our work. We have to work among the colored people, the Indians, foreign population, native whites and Cubans. The Home Mission Board has done a great work in this territory. The baptisms this year are not so many as last year by 304. The receipts have been \$75,927.54, against \$76,770.91 last year. The estimated value of the Board's property is \$104,580 this year—an increase of \$5,150 over last year.

We ought to keep in mind the good doctrine which has made us what we are as the people of God. It is because we are Missionary

Baptists that we should emphasize this point.

In proportion as we help others will the Lord help us and give us strength to help ourselves. Our Southern Board has a debt upon it which is likewise in part our debt. Our contributions in this State are not what they ought to be. We beg leave to call the attention of our pastors and delegates to the need of systematic giving throughout the year, and hope that there will be special effort made to distribute the contributions through the year rather than wait till the close of the

Associational year. It will increase our contributions, be easier done and deepen the spiritual life of our churches. While we are trying to go forward in the other departments of our work let us not stand still in the work of sending the gospel to the great world in darkness, but go forward in this likewise.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ATLANTIC BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1.—This Association shall be known as the "ATLANTIC BAPTIST

ASSOCIATION."

2.—It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty five members.

3.—It; object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their edification and for

the spread of the Gospel according to our faith and order.

4.—The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acquaintance of the insubstance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5.—This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6.—Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk-glerk's postoffice, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund and other objects.

7.—Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the eause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church.

be recovered or dropped from this Association.

8.—The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, a Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

9.—The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancements of its objects.

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of

service and details of their work.

10.—The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the Second Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory Sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11.—This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by a

two-thirds vote of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

1.—The daily Sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2.—Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches.

designating them as such.

3.—The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4.—The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and

deliver to his successor all papers belonging te the body.

5.—Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

6.—Members shall not absent themselves from the session without

permission.

7.—The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8.—Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invi-

ted to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9.—A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.

10.—All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by

"Mell's Parliamentary Practice."

11.—The report of the Executive Board, and the Missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12.-The General Order of Business shall be.

1.—Reading Church Letters and Enrollment of Delegates.

2.—Election of Officers. 3.—Petitionary Letters.

4.—Appointment of Committees for this Session.

5.-Appointment of Standing Committees.

6.—Report of Committees on Churches delinquent at the previous session.

REPORT ON MINISTER'S RELIEF BOARD.

This Board is located at Durham, N. C., Rev. W. C. Tyre is President, and Rev. J. F. McDuffie, Corresponding Secretary. Its object is to aid Baptist ministers who have devoted their lives to the preaching of the Gospel of Christ, and in old age are poor and unable to take care of themselves. This Board also aids the widows of Baptist ministers who have been left in needy circumstances. This Board has

been steadily growing in fayor with the people. It is now six years old, and has aided about forty since its organization. There are now twelve beneficiaries on the Board. The contributions for the year up to date are \$557. Your committee recommends that the pastors bring this object before the churches at least once a year. It will do our people good to be brought into sympathy with this good and worthy cause.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD.

The Home Board is under the auspices of the Southern Baptist Convention and is located at Atlanta, Ga., doing mission work in the Southern States, among the native white people, foreign population, Indians, colored race and Cubans. Our work in Cuba has been greatly hindered on account of the war; but the Missionaries on that field are doing a noble work among the refugees in Southern Florida. The Board expended last Conventional year ending May 31st '97. \$108,-848.39, Missionaries employed, 372, Churches and Stations supplied, 1963, Baptisms, 4709. New Churches organized, 139. In the bounds of our State Convention they gave \$748.13 to four Missionaries who supplied sixteen Churches and Stations who did a noble work. The Churches of our Convention contributed \$3,967.99 to this Board last year. Our Association only gave \$87.65 of this amount.

Committee on Finance reported amount of money in their hands for Home Missions, \$56.49; Ministers Relief Board, \$45.24; Orphanage, \$14.27; Foreign Missions, \$66.58; State Missions, \$79.05; Ministerial Education, \$60.98; Minute Fund, \$29.60. Total, \$352.21.

By motion of Bro. J. B. Olive the report was adopted: Rev. C. W. Planchard read the report on Orphanage as follows:

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Baptist Orphanage is located at Thomasville, N. C. It commenced operations in Nov. 1885. Four of the five College buildings have their mates; i e, a provision room, a cook room, a dining room and a work room. Besides these Colleges there are the Infirmary for the sick, the Fanny Miller Building, a work house for the girls, the Lassiter Building, that contains the office of Charity and Children, which will be changed into a printing office, and the Central Building which has been only recently completed. In all there are 15 good brick buildings belonging to the Orphanage. Since it first opened the Orphanage has cared for 375 children coming from 69 counties of this State and 9 from South Carolina. There are present now 160 homeless children, with applications before the Manager to run the number to 180. The Central Building which was occupied in June, has a small debt apon it of about \$500, which must be settled on November 1st, it being in the form of a note to a bank The Institution was never in better favor with the people than now; and it is drawing from a much wider source than ever before. The great need of the Orphanage now is, for the Pastors and Sunday School Superintendents to keep its claims before the people and widen the circulation of the Orphanage paper, Charity and Children.

By motion of Rev. C. J. Nelson the Association adjourned with benediction by Rev. J. M. Alderman until-7:30 to-night.

NIGHT SESSION.

The Moderator called the Association to order at 7:30.

Dr. E. W. Sikes addressed the Association in behalf of Wake Forest College, after which all sang, "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name."

Rev. C. W. Blanchard then spoke on Christian Education and in the interest of Wake Forest College. Prayer was then offered by Rev. J. E. White.

Bro. J. C. Scarborough represented the Chowan Baptist Female Institute in a very appropriate manner.

According to appointment of this evening a collection was taken for the Orphanage amounting to \$10.56.

Association was dismissed with benediction by Rev. J. W. Rose.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

THURSDAY, October 14th.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. H. H. Mashburn by reading the 24th chapter of Luke and prayer.

The Association was then called to order. The Clerk read minutes of second days proceedings which was adopted.

Rev. C. W. Blanchard moved that a committee of three be appointed to the Baptist State Convention and one to Southern Baptist Convention. Rev. C. W. Blanchard, Rev. S. J. Porter and Rev. James Long were the committee.

By ballot Rev. C. W. Blanchard was elected as a member of the State Mission Board.

Committee to nominate delegates to Baptist State Convention reported, recommending H. B. Duffy, T. A. Bell and Rev. J. W. Rose.

To Southern Baptist Convention Rev. H. H. Mashburn.

C. W. BLANCHARD, S. J. PORTER, JAMES LONG.

Report was adopted.

On motion by Rev. S. J. Porter, the Secretary of the Ladies' Missionary Society that convened yesterday was asked to hand a report of their proceeding to the Clerk, so it could be inserted in the minutes of the Association.

Rev. James Long suggested that the names of the President and Secretary of the Societies appear in the minutes.

Rev. J. W. Rose, G. W. Britt and F. O. Cox were appointed a committee on Constitution.

Rev. S. J. Porter read the report on Education as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

I. PRIMARY EDUCATION.

One of the objects of the Baptist State Convention is to encourage and favor the education of all the people. Under present conditions we are aware that the majority of the children of our State are dependent upon taxation for the rudiments of an education. For this reason we are in sympathy with the public school system, and favor measures to increase its efficiency

II. ACADEMIES.

Within the bounds of our Association, are a number of well equipped

academies and high schools that are doing much toword educating our youth. Some of these academies are managed by Baptist teachers. We urge our brethren to patronize them and encourage the founding of at academy in every available community.

III. MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

One of the primary objects of the Baptist State Convention is to assist indigent, worthy young men, called of God to preach the Gospel, in securing an education. The work of the Ministerial Beard of Education at Wake Forest College speaks for itself in the lives and labors of the men whom it has helped and who have preached and are now preaching in our own State, in other States and on the mission fields far away. This Board is now in need of funds to carry on its work. In the name of the Lord let us come to its aid.

IV. WAKE FOREST COLLEGE

Is the property of the Baptists of North Carolina; and a paving piece of property it is, as all must concede who have observed the glorious returns it has yielded during the last half century. It has been a potent factor in our denominational growth, and has done noble work in the service of the State. We are glad to report that during the last session there were enrolled 263 students, representing North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, Georgia, Tennessee Florida and Maryland. The new departments of Law and the Bible have justified themselves. In the Law department last year there were enrolled 85 students; and in the Bible 86 students. A healthy Christian atmosphere has prevailed which is by no means a hindrance to progressive study and research. We rejoice in the success of our college.

V. FEMALE EDUCATION.

The Baptist Female University is a necessity. The exterior of the handsome building is mearing completion. To preserve our girls as sympathetic workers in our denomination we must educate them under Baptist influences.

Oxford Female Seminary and Chowan Baptist Institute are well worthy of the patronage they enjoy. They have accomplished a great deal of good, and a bright future lies before them.

VI. STATE AND EDUCATION.

We are unalterably opposed to the policy of the State in granting subsidies to certain institutions of learning. As the disestablishment of the Church was for the welfare of Christianity, so we believe that the disestablishment of schools for higher education would result in good. We condemn the policy of State aid to higher education as unjust to the people of the State, unfair to other institutions of learning, and unwise as a matter of State economy; but our resistance shall be open and manly.

Rev. James Long moved that a collection now be taken for Board of Education. Motion was carried and collection taken amounting to \$88.79.

Rev. H. H. Mashburn read report on Foreign Missions as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

God's love moved Him to give His Son that a lost world might through Him be saved. The Son says, As thou hast sent me into the world even so have I also sent them into the world. John 17:18. The noblest work of heaven and earth, therefore, is to spread world-wide the knowledge of the saving power of gospel. The pulse of christianity is rarely stronger than its efforts to carry out the great commission. We are glad that Southern Baptists are preaching the word of God in Mexico, Brazil, Italy, China, Japan and Africa. Eighty six missionaries with three or four times as many native helpers are doing the work. But there is great need that yet larger efforts be put forth. Every church in the Atlantic Association ought to increase its activities in this work.

Report was spoken on by Revs. H. H. Mashburn and S. J. Porter and adopted.

J. H. Eaton offered the following resolutions which were adopted:

Resolved, That the visiting delegation of this body hereby express

their hearty thanks and appreciation for the very kind and hospitable manner in which we have been received and entertained by the brethren and citizens of Goldsboro.

Resolved, That the Association express its appreciation and extend thanks to the Argus for reporting the proceedings of the Association and also to the A. & N. C. R. R. for reduced rates to the delegates.

Rev. James Long moved that the Association should not adjourn until the business of the body was finished. Motion adopted.

Rey. R. D. Carroll read the rep rt on Temperance as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

As a religious denomination we need to have some well defined convictions upon the subject of Temperance. Then we need the courage of those convictions. We all admit that intemperance is a stupendous evil. It is a curse to all who are affected by it. The best code of morals must be taught by the churches of Jesus Christ. What, then, shall be the attitude of the more than thirty five churches that compose this Association to the temperance movement, to be plain, to the liquor traffic? Let total abstinence be the standard adopted by all these churches, and let not one compromise with intemperance or indulge drunkenness among its members, and let not the Association recognize any church that fellowships liquor dealers. Let all the pastors preach upon the subject of temperance at least once a year, and instruct their people and congregations upon this all important subject. What we need is not to resolute here in the session of the Association, but to do some earnest telling work among the people in their homes. If the people were as temperate in their homes as they ought to be, we would not need to discuss the matter in our annual meetings and pass resolutions that the mass of the people never know anything about.

By motion it was made the duty of the Executive Committee to look after the churches, &c., mentioned in the seventh article of the constitution.

Rev. J. W. Rose read report of committee on Constitution as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION.

We your committee on Constitutional Amendments recommend that Section 8 of Constitution shall require the Association's Historian to bring a report before the Association each year giving a summary of the progress of the work in our field, which shall be incorporated in our annual minutes.

Report was spoken on by Rev. J. W. Rose and adopted.

On motion by Rev. J. W. Rose the Clerk was allowed his usual salary and instructed to expend balance of minute money in printing minutes.

Rev. S. J. Porter suggested that a map of the territory and churches, &c., of the Association be embodied in the minutes if there was money enough in hands for same.

Rev. Jas. Long stated that he would offer a motion at the next session of the Association relative to dividing the Association and making of it two separate and distinct bodies.

Rev. James Long moved that all amounts that could be collected from pledges already made be turned over to H. B. Duffy for the Colportage work. Motion adopted.

Finance committee reported again as follows: Amounts received from Bayboro and Vandemere churches, Education \$2.00; Home Missions, \$2.00; Orphanage, \$3.50; Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Minute Fund, \$1.00. Total, \$10.50. The report was adopted.

Rev. R. D. Carroll moved that the money now in the hands of the Finance committee be turned over to the Clerk with instructions to disburse it to its respective places. Motion carried.

Rev. R. D. Carroll begged for a large representation of delegates at the next session of the Association to be held at Davis Shore. He stated that the Davis Shore church had requested that at least 200 delegates would be in attendance. The delegates will be met at Morehead City by good boatmen and boats and given free transportation from Morehead City to Davis Shore and return.

Rev. J. T. Jenkins made some brief and encouraging state ments about Bro. Johnson's work at Atlantic and stated that he was in need of a house of worship, and that with the assistance of \$50 he would be able now to procure a house suitable to the occasion. Pledges were then taken for that object as follows, to be paid on or before Jan. 1st, 1898:

Report of Executive Committee was read by Rev. J. T. Jenkins and adopted as follows:

The Executive Committee of the Atlantic Association met in the Sunday School room of the First Baptist Church, Goldsboro, Oct. 18th, 1897. Chairman announced that the only thing to be done at this meet ing was to hear from Rev. J. E. White in regard to amount we might expect from the State Board, Bro, White stated that if the Association will give \$500 to the State Board we may expect \$1,000 from the Board for the Associational work.

The Association pledged today \$800, \$300 of which remains to be used by us at the discretion of the Executive Committee. It was agreed to recommend Tabernacle Church, Newbern, N. C., for appropriation of \$300 to be paid ont of the \$1,000 by the State Board. Bro. White stated however that the State Board was already under obligations to

give the Tabernacle church the \$300.

Report of Womans Missionary Meeting of the Atlantic Association.

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On Wednesday afternoon, Oct. 13th, a goodly number of ladies of the Goldsooro Missionary Society, visiting ladies and others, met in St. Paul's M. E. Chnrch. Mrs. H. B. Duffy, of Newbern. N. C., Vice President, in the chair. After the singing, responsive scripture reading, and prayer by Miss Draughn, of Kinston, followed by another hymn, the meeting was addressed by our State Mission Secretary Bio. J. E. White. He urged the women of today for whom the Gospel has done so much, to show their love for Christ and His cause by helping others less favored, and by prayer and personal effort to do their part in winning to Christ lost ones in their homes, their neighborhood and wherever their influence extends.

An expression of thanks from the ladies was given Bro. White for his inspiring address.

Mrs. Grant was asked to act as Secretary. Mrs. Duffy then read a letter from our State President, Miss Heck, which was full of helpful suggestions, loving counsel and encouragement for our work. This was followed by the reading of letters from some of our Missionaries concerning their work, customs of the people and obstacles in the way, all of which were exceedingly interesting as read by Misses Draughn Farrior and Mrs. Crow,

Reports were then celled for from the different Societies represented in the meeting. Mrs. Pipkin, President of Goldsboro Society, gave a verbal report and Miss Parrott, of Kinston, read a report of that Society. It was found by inquiry that many churches had no Woman's Society, and that others had failed to send reports. It was urged that each Woman's Society be represented by a delegate hereafter at the Associational meetings, or if that is not practicable a written report be sent.

Miss Draughn gave some details of the work which has been begun in the Kinston church through their Missionary Society, and urged all to more diligence in the Lord's work, more consecration—and more prayer.

After singing another hymn, the meeting adjourned, all present having felt it "good to be there."

CONSTITUTION of the ATLANTIC BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

1.—This Association shall be known as the "ATLANTIC BAPTIST ASSOCIATION."

2.—It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unles the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty five members.

3.—Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the cooperation of its churches for their edification and for

the spread of the Gospel according to our faith and order.

4.—The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acquaint-ance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5.—This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6.—Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's postoffice, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary, church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage. Minute Fund and other objects.

7.—Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report somthing contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort sholl be continued till the church

be recovered or dropped from the Association.

8.—The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, a Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body, the Historian in keeping a record of the work and progress of the Association and report at each annual session.

9.—The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our teritory, and between the meetings of the Associations take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancements of its objects.

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of

service and details of their work.

10.—The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the Second Lord's Day in October, as such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory Sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a querum.

11.—This Constitution may be amended at any aunual session by a

two-thirds vote of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

- 1—The daily Sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2—Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches, designating them as such.
- 3—The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.
- 4—The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each Annual Session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.
- 5—Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.
- 6-Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission.
- 7—The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.
- 8—Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting,
- 9—A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.
- 10—All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by 'Mell's Parliamentary Practice."
- 11—The report of the Executive Board, and the Missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.
 - 12-The General Order of Business shall be:
 - 1—Reading Church Letters and Enrollment of Delegates.
 - 2—Election of Officers.
 - 3—Petitionary Letters.
 - 4—Appointment of Committees for this Session.
 - 5-Appointment of Standing Committees.
- 6-Report of Committees on Churches delinquent at the previous session.
 - 7-Reports of Standing Committees.
 - 8-Reports of other Committees.
 - 9-Miscellaneous Business.

The Moderator extended the hand of welcome to the following new pastors in the Association: John Lewis, G. B. Webster, W. L. Bilbro and Hight C. Moore.

After announcements, the Association adjourned with benediction by W. L. Bilbro.

SECOND DAY—WEDNESDAY MORNING.

The Association met at 9.30 o'clock. Devotional exercises were conducted by W. L. Bilbro, who read Psalms 95 and 96.

The Moderator appointed the following Committee on Place and Preacher: G. B. Webster, A. P. Barrow and E. B. Lewis.

Minutes of yesterday evening were read and approved.

List of churches and messengers was read and corrected.

C. W. Blanchard read the report of the Executive Committee. Remarks were made by C. W. Blanchard on the work in general; R. D. Carroll on the East Carteret field; J. B. Olive, W. J. Montford and B. H. Matthews on the Onslow field; James Long and C. B. Paul on the Pamlico field; H. C. Lockhart on Moore's Chapel; J. M. Alderman on the field in Jones and Craven counties; W. L. Bilbro and E. B. Lewis on the Pitt County field; J. W. Rose on the Wayne, Greene and Lenoir field; H. H. Mashburn on the Newbern Tabernacle. The report was then adopted.

R. D. Carroll made report on order of business, as follows:

Meet at 2 o'clock for miscellaneous business; 2.15. report on State Missions; 3.15, report on Orphanage; adjourn at 4. Meet at 6.30 to hear report on Education; 7.30, report on Periodicals; 8.15, miscellaneous business; adjourn at will.

After announcements, the Association adjourned, with benediction by John E. White.

SECOND DAY-Wednesday Afternoon.

The Association reassembled at the hour appointed, and was led in prayer by John Lewis.

H. H. Mashburn made the report on Petitionary Letters, which was adopted. The right hand of fellowship to the messengers of the six new churches was extended by the Moderator.

On motion of W. J. Montford, the name of Enon Church, now non-existent through dissolution to form two other churches, was stricken from our roll.

The Moderator appointed the Committee on Petitionary Letters to investigate and report next year concerning delinquent churches.

Hight C. Moore read the report on State Missions, which was spoken to by John E. White. A cash collection of \$9.81 was taken for State Missions. James Long read a report from the Woman's Central Committee of Missions.

The report on State Missions was then adopted.

J. M. Alderman read the report on the Orphanage. Remarks by J. M. Alderman, H. H. Mashburn, G. B. Webster, J. W. Rose, C. W. Blanchard and James Long Pledges were then taken for the Orphanage (see table).

James Long presented the following resolution, which, as an amendment, was adopted with the report:

Resolved, That we urge every Sunday School in the Atlantic Association to take at least one collection per month for our Orphanage at Thomasville.

W. L. Bilbro, for the Committee to Nominate Executive Board, submitted their report, which was adopted. (See names under head of "Officers.")

John D. Davis, for the Finance Committee, reported the following amounts received from the churches, and turned over to the Treasurer:

Adjourned, with benediction by J. W. Rose.

SECOND DAY—WEDNESDAY EVENING.

The Moderator called the Association to order at 6.30 p. m. (4. B. Webster led in prayer.

John Lewis read the report on Education. Remarks by H. H. Mashburn, Hight C. Moore and C. W. Blanchard. Pledges were taken for Ministerial Education (see table) and the report adopted.

J. W. Rose presented the report on Temperance. Remarks by J.W. Rose and J. B. Olive. Adopted.

W. J. Montford, for Committee on Obituaries, submitted an article from the Biblical Recorder on the late George D. Styron. It was received and ordered printed in the Minutes.

On motion, R. D. Carroll offered the report on Ministerial Relief Board, which, after remarks by James Long, was adopted.

The report on Home Missions was presented by James Long. After remarks by James Long, G. B. Webster and J. W. Rose, pledges were taken (see table) and the report adopted.

James Long presented a petition regarding the division of the Association, which was laid upon the table by a vote of 23 to 17.

- E. B. Lewis made report of the Committee on Constitutional Amendment. That part of the report recommending a change in the time of meeting of the Association was rejected. The first part of the report was recommitted for certain amendments.
- R. D. Carroll reported for Committee on Order of Business, as follows:

Adjourned with benediction by W. L. Bilbro.

THIRD DAY—THURSDAY MORNING.

The Association met at 9.30 Devotional exercises were conducted by John Lewis.

The Association was called to order by H. H. Mashburn. Minutes of yesterday were read by E. B. Lewis, and approved.

The Moderator, assuming the chair, announced the standing committees for the coming year (see list).

On motion, a Committee on Sunday Schools was appointed, as follows: E. B. Lewis, G. W. Parker, T. C. Willis.

S. D. Byrd, for Committee to Nominate Delegates to State and Southern Baptist Conventions, made the following report, which was adopted:

To State Convention: J. M. Alderman, G. B. Webster, E. B. Lewis; alternates, M. S. Webb, H. T. Jones and H. H. Mashburn.
To Southern Baptist Convention: Hight C. Moore, with R. D. Carroll alternate.

The following were appointed a Committee to Nominate Associational Member of State Board of Missions: R. D. Carroll, James Long and J. M. Alderman. The Committee reported the name of C. W. Blanchard, who was unanimously elected.

G. B. Webster, for Committee on Place and Preacher, reported as follows, which was adopted:

Your Committee recommend Tabernacle Church, Newbern, as the place; Tuesday after the second Sunday in October, the time; and Rev. John Lewis, of Morehead City, to preach the Introduc tory Sermon, James Long alternate.

E. B. Lewis read the report on Foreign Missions. Remarks by E. B. Lewis and C. W. Blanchard. Pledges were taken and the report adopted. One member in each church was appointed to represent the cause of Foreign Missions the coming year. (See list annexed to table of Pledges.)

C. B. Paul presented the report on Periodicals. Remarks by J. W. Rose, E. B. Lewis, R. D. Carroll, H. H. Mashburn, C. W. Blan chard and G. B. Webster. Report adopted.

On motion, the question of the division of the Association was taken from the table and remarks made by James Long, J. B. Olive, H. H. Mashburn and R. D. Carroll. The petition was then granted, as follows:

Whereas, We believe it to be to the best interest of the Master's cause in this Association, that there be a division of the territory of the Association, we, the undersigned, do petition the Atlantic As-Sociation the privilege of calling at Fort Barnwell, in Craven County, N. John Lewis made the following report on Constitutional amendment, which was adopted:

Add to Article II: Every church having a Ladies' Missionary Society shall be entitled to one additional female delegate to represent it on the Woman's Central Committee.

James Long presented his report as Historian. The report was ordered incorporated in the tables of the Minutes.

The Association then adjourned to meet with the Tabernacle at Newbern on Tuesday after the second Sunday in October, 1899.

REPORTS.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

With a territory covering so large an area as the Atlantic Association, and so much of it unoccupied by the Baptists, it has been a difficult task for your Committee to perform its duty satisfactory to itself. In the light of all the claims presented from this immense field of destitution, we have used every possible precaution, and as fairly disbursed the funds placed at our disposal as it was possible to do. The results at the close of the year have more fully justified the wisdom of our course than, in the beginning, we could have expected.

The Board of Missions of the Baptist State Convention put \$1,000 at our disposal, with the understanding that our contributions should all be made through the Board, and in lieu of the fact that \$803 was pledged by our churches at the last session of the Association for this purpose, the Board accepted applications for \$1,075, to

be paid to our missionaries during 1898.

It can be said that a steady march of progress has been made in most of the territory under our supervision, which is highly gratifying.

A SUMMARY OF THE WORK.

Rev. R. D. Carroll was employed to occupy the field in Carteret County, comprising Smyrna, Davis and Woodville churches, with a mission at Marshallsburg. In addition to the work allotted to brother Carroll, he has preached at Harker's Island and Hog Island. On his field proper, the work has advanced equal to our expectations, and a hopeful outlook is now before him of organizing churches at Marshallsburg, Harker's Island and Hog Island. Adding to these points Atlantic, a point that was worked a year ago by Rev. Walter Johnson, who left us a house of worship there, and Piny Point, a place where the people are calling for some Baptist preaching, that has not been supplied, we have in Carteret County ample work for two men another year. It is not amiss to say that our work must suffer in this section if we do not give brother Carroll some help. The Board is helping this field to the amount of \$75 this year.

Rev. Geo. D. Styron was pastor of Moore's Chapel, Cool Springs and Swansboro churches in Craven and Onslow counties. At no place has better returns of good fruit fellowed the labor of a missionary than at Swansboro. A little more than a year ago this church was constituted with about fifteen members, but its roll

now has advanced beyond a hundred, and the work promises to be of great help to that section of the Association. To our sad loss and bereavement, on the 1st day of September, brother Styron laid down his work under our direction and entered into the labors of a higher calling above. For this reason we have no definite report from the other churches he was serving, but are satisfied that no work lagged under his care. The appropriation to brother Styron's

support from the Board was \$75.

Rev. H. Mashburn is pastor of the Tabernacle Church at Newbern. He also preaches one week-night in each month at Cove. We have had no definite report from brother Mashburn's field, but are well satisfied that the work has not suffered under his care. On account of the heavy indebtedness of the Tabernacle and the struggle they would have in sustaining themselves in the noble mission work they were undertaking in Newbern, the State Board of Missions entered into a contract with them two years ago to give them \$1,000 help, \$400 of it in 1897, \$300 in 1898, \$200 in 1899, and \$100 in 1900. This agreement, however, was made by the State Board direct, and was not a part of the burden of the Executive Committee.

Rev. D. P. Harris agreed to serve Bayboro, Vandemere and Bay Creek churches in Pamlico County, and Oregon in Beaufort County. He also had two out stations for once a month preaching. source of grief that more favorable reports could not be given from this part of our Association. However, the failure is not to be attributed to the lack of effort on the part of brother Harris. Some time during the year-we are not informed when-brother Harris ceased to serve Oregon and Bay Creek, and has later entered the school-room at Vandemere. The Chairman of the Executive Committee recently paid a visit to the Beaufort County part of this field and arranged for Rev. J. N. Booth, of Washington, to serve Oregon Church and a mission at Aurora, without charge to the Board. There are two other points in Beaufort County that ought to have preaching at once. The Committee feels it a necessity to put a strong man of experience in Pamlico County, and assure him a living till the field is developed. We obligated to pay to brother Harris \$150 this year.

Rev. J. M. Alderman is pastor of Pollocksville, Maysville, Piny Grove and Trenton churches in Jones County, and Spring Garden and Fort Barnwell in Craven County. He also has done some preaching at a school house some four miles from Fort Barnwell in the direction of Dover. While there have been no marvellous outbreaks of prosperity on this field, we are gratified to see that one man in all this territory has been at all able to hold the work together. The work under brother Alderman's wise management and assiduous efforts has made steady advancement as a whole. This field, with an out-station or two, will furnish ample work for two men another year. It will doubtless be wise and economical for the Board to form a field in Jones County another year and one in Craven, and put two men to serve them in their growing demand for more personal work and preaching. This year the Board gave

brother Alderman \$150 on this entire field.

Rev. W. L. Bilbro has charge of the work in Pitt County. Winterville and Ayden are his two churches, with two out-stations where he gives once a-month preaching. At Ayden arrangements have been made for the completion of the house of worship, and at Winterville a new one built out and out. The Committee has not had a report of the work in particular, but is warranted that good progress has been made on this field. We were to help the Pitt County field at the rate of \$175 per year. The Board will need to give some aid to this field another year, but can make considerable

reduction inasmuch as there is no house of worship to build this

vear.

Rev. J. W. Rose has work in three counties. In Wayne County he has the Second Church in Goldsboro and Seven Springs; in Lenoir County he serves Union and LaGrange churches, and in Greene County Snow Hill and Castoria. Good reports will come to the Association from brother Rose's field. At Castoria he has organized a noble little band of workers that will begin an era of prosperity for the Baptists in that destitute county. There are two or three missions in Greene County that are now available, but are without preaching. There are six churches in Wayne County, two in Greene County and three in Lenoir County, eleven in all, that by all means ought to have the services of two men for all of their The Committee recommends the adding of another man to

This year we paid \$100 to brother Rose. this field.

Rev. C. W. Blanchard has not been under the employment of the Board, nor received any pay for services from it, but to keep New Hope Church from being without preaching he has served that church once a month on Sunday afternoons and on Saturday mornings. A good meeting was held there and the outlook is good for our cause in the future. Besides this, at regular monthly appointments, he has preached at Falling Creek, near the station, near which place there will soon be the need of a Baptist church. He recently opened a mission at Dover, also, which speedily resulted in the organization of a church with ten members and an outlook for a good ingathering real soon. Within the next year a house of worship will be needed at Dover, and this point could go to make out a full field in Craven County. At Lousin Swamp, where he has preached several times, is open a fine and hopeful mission, and near Coahoma, southeast from Kinston about six miles, is another point that should be occupied at once.

Onslow County is ripe and ready for the Baptists to occupy. Brother B. H. Matthews, who succeeded so well there, has gone to

western North Carolina.

If the churches in Onslow County will agree to employ a man between them, they will be able, by a little help, to secure a strong man that can push that work to a high state of development. we most earnestly hope they will do, and then receive the coopera-

tion of the next Executive Committee of the Association.

We have laid before you the work undertaken by us last year, and touched upon the results in general and as best we can, have outlined recommendations for the next year. To do what seems to be altogether necessary, another year will require the expenditure of at least \$1,750 from the State Board of Missions. We hope to get the endorsement of the Association in its present session in a plea for this amount from the State Board.

Under the direction of the Executive Committee, two series of Denominational Institutes were held last spring with the churches of Revs. J. W. Rose and J. M. Alderman. The good results of these institutes attest the wisdom of carrying out the plan of the Committee to hold one with each mission point in the Association. It is to be hoped that the several pastors of the Association will cooperate with the Committee another year, selecting the best season for the meetings and assure the success of this plan.

In consideration of the great need of the Atlantic Association to cover so much destitution in its own bounds, we most earnestly plead with all the churches to increase their liberality for the support of this work, and recommend that we cooperate as closely as

possible with the State Board of Missions in our efforts.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Baptist Orphanage, located at Thomasville, N. C., began operations in November, 1885. Since that time it has cared for 417 orphans. During the past year 42 were received, and the total en-rollment is 196. The average attendance has been 161. The average cost of supporting them has been \$56. It is safe to say that this

vear \$5 per month has supported an orphan.

Although there were 110 cases of measles among them the past year, through the faithful ministrations and loving care of those in charge. 109 of them recovered. In the single case in which death occurred, it was more on account of heart-fai ure than measles. Only one other death—little Oscar Wasdon came sick from Washington and died in a few days. While we are sorry to report the death of these two, we are glad to say the general health of the children is excellent.

In addition to the 15 good brick buildings, the year closes with the completion of the General Manager's house. This will open to full use the Infirmary, and will require an employee for that posi-

We are glad to report progress on all lines—Charity and Children is now printed in new quarters and on an improved press. The

farm is being better tilled and with greater yields.

But it is painful to report that some of the friends of the Orphanage have died. This, however, is not without its good results, as at least two of their remembered the institution in their wills. Living. they loved the Orphanage; dying, they provided for its necessities.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your Committee to report on State Missions begs leave to call at-

tention to four points:

1. The Work. One of the primary objects of our State Convention is "to support the gospel in all the destitute sections of the To this end our fathers labored with fervor, and to day hundreds of our strongest and most flourishing churches stand as monuments to their zeal and wisdom. But the field has not been covered. There is mission ground in every one of the forty-six associations united in our Convention. There are yet vast stretches of territory unoccupied by our forces. And to us with peculiar force comes the trumpet call of duty to station ourselves at every outpost and thus capture North Carolina for Christ.

2. The Workers. We have this year 103 regular missionaries in the destitute fields of the State. With meagre support, and yet with unwavering fidelity, these men have labored in neglected spots with most satisfactory results. In addition, the members of the Volunteer Mission Corps, embracing 87 of our ablest and most honored pastors, have gone without any pay into the waste places and there proclaimed the gospel with efficiency and success. These 190 men have done and are doing well their work; and God has set upon their labors the seal of His approval.

3. The Means. The sacrifice of the workers and the success of their work are indeed gratifying; but the indifference and tardiness of their supporters are lamentable. Our work for this Conventional year was planned on a basis of \$15,000, as authorized at Oxford; yet last week, with the Greenville Convention only ten weeks off, Treasurer Boushall was able to report only \$4,385.31 received for State

Missions this year. Either there must be a speedy revival of liberality to this work, or we shall go to Greenville in debt to our faithful missionaries. Which shall it be? We can, in part, decide.

4. The Outlook. In this work there must be no retrogression. Never before has the State Mission work been so important as now, and never before has it been in greater need of abundant means and efficient laborers. The immense latent force in our churches must be developed; aggressive and dangerous heresies must be met; converts must be won from the haunts of darkness and the ranks of error; hundreds of churches are yet to be established and fortified against the Evil One. If we are negligent and miserly in this hour of need, only divine omniscience can foresee the darkness that will exist in the coming generation. But if we are faithful and liberal now, we may confidently anticipate the not distant day when our churches, loyal, efficient and aggressive, shall be found in every community—

"From Mitchell the pride of the mountains To Hatteras the dread of the sea."

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Home Missions is one department of the work of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Home Mission Board is located at Atlanta, Ga. The amount generally raised is about \$100,000 per year. It is partly expended in paying salaries of missionaries, and partly expended in building houses of worship, and also in sustaining schools in the out-districts of the South. Also, under the auspices of this Board, the Woman's Missionary Societies of the Southern Baptist Convention send many boxes to frontier missionaries of the Southwest. Its work is among the whites of the South, the negroes of the South, the Indians of the South and Indian Territory, also in Cuba.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

It can be no longer a question of duty as to whether we should engage in world-wide missions. The ministry of the past one hundred years has practically demonstrated the logical force of the "great commission" to give the gospel of Christ to the entire world, by the successes that have followed it wherever it has loyally carried out the commission. The divine approval of the Fcreign Mission enterprise has not more signally attended the efforts of those people who engage in them, on their foreign fields, than by the reflex influence which is seen in their real prosperity at home.

History affords no exception to the rule that a church or community's prosperity at home is exactly measured by its interest and sacrifice for the extension of the Master's Kingdom abroad. No people, therefore, in the light of truth and providence, can have any just claim for respect as loyal disciples who do not emphasize the obligation to give the world the gospel. The lessons of the past, and the open doors for the future, with the "Macedonian cry" for help from every known place of destitution, should urge us to deeper thought and effort for the world's speedy redemption.

What would seem to be a reasonable sacrifice on the part of the people of the Atlantic Association would quadruple their gifts to Foreign Missions and enable them to support a foreign missionary in and of themselves—this would take less than one-fourth of a dollar per capita from our present membership. In consideration of the importance of the work, and the urgent calls from the field, we do not feel it extravagant to recommend that a systematic effort be encouraged in all our churches, by this body, to strive within the next year to make their contributions to Foreign Missions come up to this standard. To this end we believe it would be wise for a committee of one from each church to be appointed by this Association, whose duty will be to solicit for this object from their respective congregations, and keep all funds thus collected promptly for warded to the Treasurer of the Baptist State Convention, and make a full report of the work done by them to the Association at its annual meetings.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF BOARD.

This Board is located at Durham, N. C., and is seven years old. It has a President and Secretary. Its work is to care for aged and wornout Baptist ministers who are poor and unable to take care of themselves. It also aids the widows of poor Baptist ministers who have been left destitute. The Board is dependent upon the voluntary contributions of the churches and brethren, and is growing in favor with the people, and so doing a larger work than ever before. The Board is now earing for about twenty persons, and there are others who need help. But not more than \$500 have been received since the last Convention.

Your Committee recommends that all the churches take at least one collection for this Board every year, and that the pastors present the claims of the Board to their people and give them all needed

information about its work.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

1. Primary Education.

We have noticed with pleasure the interest taken in the education of the people by our denominational press, especially by the Biblical Recorder, and we heartily approve the efforts to remove

the stigma of illiteracy from our fair State.

We also commend the efforts of those who seek to have the money that is now unjustly and unwisely used by the State for the higher education of a favored few applied to the education of the masses of the people. This is very desirable not only in view of the responsibilities of citizenship, but also in view of Christian work, especially that in our Sunday Schools.

A sademic.

Wherever there are high schools and academies conducted by working Baptist teachers, we recommend that these schools be patronized by our people in preference to others.

We consider that Buie's Creek and Winterville Academies are worthy of the consideration of all young people struggling for an

education.

3. Col'egiate.

We rejoice to learn that the attendance at Wake Forest College was so large during the past year, and that the prospects for the present year are so bright. Since the character of the work done and the Christian spirit prevailing in the institution has been and is so excellent, we are sure that a school so deserving of the support of the people will receive it.

4. Female.

Considering that the home life is at the very foundation of all that is good in the world, and that the influence of woman in the home is so great, we recognize the great importance of female education, and would impress upon all our people the desirability and necessity of encouraging the same.

The Oxford Female Seminary and the Chowan Baptist Institute

are deserving of our sympathy.

We also hope that the finances of our Baptist Female University at Raleigh will permit the completion of the buildings and the opening of the school before the close of the present Associational year.

5. Sunday Schools.

As the Sunday School is such an important Christian educational agency, we urge upon the churches the necessity of organizing and equipping Sunday Schools wherever and whenever there is an opportunity. Also the necessity of bringing the schools already in existence to the very highest point of efficiency. We moreover heartily approve the action of our State Convention in placing a Sunday School missionary on the field.

6. C. C. C. of the B. Y. P. U.

Wherever young people's societies have been organized in our churches, we recommend that they undertake the study of the C. C. Course of the B. Y. P. U., or some other course of study that will help our young people to become more intelligent Christians and workers in our Baptist churches.

7. Ministerial Education.

We consider that this department of our work is no longer an experiment, but has long ago proved its right to exist and have the

sympathy and support of our people.

Since the salaries of our pastors in many if not most instances are still not such as to warrant them in contracting a debt to obtain the necessary education without aid, we urge that our churches will continue to contribute liberally toward ministerial education.

REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

On Friday morning, September 2, 1898, the relatives and numerous friends of brother George D. Styron were shocked and saddened by a message from the home of Dr. Saunders, of Eogue, saving that he had fallen asleep the night before. Since the ingathering at Swansboro and other churches last spring our brother had been making his home at Swansboro, the most central part of his field. But the week before his death he was at Morehead City and took part in the prayer-meeting on Thursday night. He preached at Moore's Chapel on Sunday morning. On the night of his death he was preaching at Cool Springs. As he was about to close the service. he was struck speechless and unconscious. Friends carried him immediately to the home of Dr. Saunders, but in spite of all the efforts to restore him he passed away about twelve o'clock. It appears that the immediate cause of his death was apoplexy.

Our brother was born November 4, 1866, and was therefore about thirty-two years of age. He confessed Christ at a protracted meeting held in the Methodist church, by brother C. S. Cashwell, now of Waynesville, and became a member of the Baptist church March 20, 1882. After being licensed to preach and exercising his gifts for some time, he was ordained to the gospel ministry by a presbytery composed of brother J. T. Jenkins and brother R. D. Carroll, about December, 1896. His first pastorate was at Moore's Chapel, but at the time of his death he was serving the churches at Swansboro, Piny Grove, Cool Springs and Moore's Chapel. His heart had recently been cheered by large additions to the membership of more than one of these churches.

His membership was with the church in Morehead City, and whenever he was in town he was always at its prayer and conference meetings. At one of the last conference meetings, he made a motion for the selection of some new deacons. His friends were numerous; these, with his two brothers and five sisters, mourn after him. What is their loss is his gain. May the gracious Father comfort them and help them to follow him even as he followed

Christ.

WOMAN'S MEETING.

JOHN LEWIS.

The Woman's Missionary Meeting of the Atlantic Association was held at Davis, N. C., Thursday morning. October 13, 1898.

Miss A. E. Dranghan, Vice-President for the Association, led in devotional exercises, and then called the meeting to order. Mrs. Hight C. Moore was asked to act as Secretary.

It was decided to form a permanent organization auxiliary to the Atlantic Association. "Workers together with God," was the

motto adopted.

On motion of Mrs. H. L. Grant, a committee was appointed to frame a Constitution. The President appointed Mrs. H. L. Grant, Mrs. Hight C. Moore and Miss Lena Spain. Miss Draughan was added to the Committee as chairman.

The following was duly submitted for insertion in the Minutes:

The object of the Woman's auxiliary to the Atlantic Baptist Association is the diffusion of missionary information among our women, the consequent increase in and love for missions—Home, Foreign and State—the bringing together of the workers at the yearly associations for the discussion of methods of work that are found to be practical and up building, the formation of new mission societies where none existed, and the enlisting of the young women and children in separate societies, or with the older women in work for the Master.

As Christ has said. "Go! work in My vineyard," we desire to answer with united heart and voice, "Lord, here am 1"; and we have His promise, "Lo! I am with you even unto the end of the world."

In order to obtain the highest efficiency from our organization and ascertain what progress is made from year to year, it is desirable that each missionary society send a delegate, if possible, to the Association, with a report, verbal or written, of the year's work and prospects for the future. If no delegate can be present, each

Society should forward its written report to the Associational Vice President, that it may be presented at the Woman's Meeting.

Miss Draughan then made an address emphasizing the need of mission work, the responsibility of the individual, and the ability of all to do something for Christ.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ATLANTIC BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Asso-

ciation.'

2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members. Every church having a Ladies' Missionary Society shall be entitled to one additional female delegate to represent it on the Woman's Central Committee.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by seening the cooperation of its churches for their edification and for the spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acquaintance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the

Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its 'ocality: (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's postoffice, delegates and ministers of their than the pastor: (3) Sunday or Sundays of regular service: (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics: (6) contributions to pastor's salary, church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund and other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or dropped from the Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, a Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body, the Historian in keeping a record of the work and pro-

gress of the Association, and report at each annual session.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, cooperate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its objects. The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and details of their work.

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11. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by

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BY-LAWS.

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2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches,

designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the Minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.

5. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

On motion of A. W. Setzer, a committee on Digest of Church Letters was, after discussion by C. B. Paul E. B. Lewis, H. B. Duffy and J. C. Whitty, appointed as follows: A. W. Setzer, David Sutton, J. M. Alderman.

J. B. Jackson presented the following report:

The committee has no report from the unrepresented churches, and the only report the committee can make is a recommendation that they be continued in the Association.

After remarks by J. M. Alderman, D. F. Aman, C. B. Paul and C. W. Blanchard, the committee was asked to make further report later on in the session.

A. H. Harnly, for the committee, made the following report:

Your Committee on Petitionary Letters having examined the letter and inquired into the organization of the Marshallberg Baptist Church, find that the church was regularly organized in harmony with the usages of our denomination, and do hereby recommend that said church be received into the Atlantic Association, and that its delegates be given seats in this body.

The report was adopted and the hand of welcome was extended by the Moderator to the messengers of the Marshallberg Church.

R. B. John, pastor of the Methodist Church in New Bern, was recognized and introduced to the body.

After announcements, the Association adjourned with prayer by C. B. Paul.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

C. B. Paul conducted the devotional exercises by reading Psalm 103 and offering prayer.

Additional delegates were enrolled.

J. M. Alderman presented the report of the Committee on Minister's Relief as follows:

REPORT OF MINISTER'S RELIEF BOARD

This Board is located at Durham, N. C., with W. C. Tyree as its President and J. F. MacDuffle as its Corresponding Secretary. It began its work under the auspices of the North Carolina Baptist

State Convention May 3, 1890.

There are and have been eighteen Associations helped by this Board. There is only one of the beneficiaries now on the Board who was admitted at the beginning, the rest having passed to their reward. There are two of the beneficiaries (widows of ministers) -having married, and now being supported by their husbands-

who are not included in the death of the beneficiaries.

The Board has an amount loaned out on real estate of permanent interest bearing fund of (Report of 1897) \$1,250. It has appropriated from permanent interest bearing fund (Report of 1897) \$305. There has been a loan since the report of 1897. This will give us a larger appropriation from this fund this year. The amount appropriated to beneficiaries by the Board since its organization is (about) \$3.804. The amount appropriated since last Convention up to last of July is \$235.

In consideration of the importance of this Board, and the urgent calls it is making for these brethren who have stood where we are standing now, and who have "cried aloud and spared not," your committee wishes to recommend the same as the committees of the last two years—"that all the churches take at least one collection for this Board during the year, and that the pastors present the claims of the Board to their people and give them the needed information concerning its work."

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We believe that the liquor traffic is the most fruitful source of evil in this country; that it is sowing more poison, blasting more families, filling more prisons, entailing more insanity, suicides and murders, and sending more souls into perdition than any other sin. We further believe that every Christian ought to put himself on the side of temperance, and use his voice, his pen, his prayers and his

vote for the downfall of this great curse. We recommend that the pastors in the Atlantic Association be requested to preach and keep before their churches and people the awful evil of the great sin of intemperance.

H. B. Duffy made the following announcement as to the order of business: Report on Orphanage at the conclusion of sermon tonight; Wednesday 9.30 a. m.; devotional exercises conducted by J. B. Holland; 10, report of Executive Committee and Committee on State Missions; adjournment at will.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by A. W. Setzer. Subject, "Wanted, A Man." His text was 1 Cor. xvi. 13.

The Moderator extended the hand of welcome to W. C. Newton, the new pastor at the First Church, Goldsboro.

The following visiting brethren were recognized and welcomed to seats in the body: N. B. Broughton, representing the Biblical Recorder; J. B. Boone, General Manager of the Thomasville Orphanage; E. J. Edwards, representing the North Carolina Baptist; F. W. Luxford, pastor of the Christian Church, New Bern; John E. White, Corresponding Secretary of the North Carolina Baptist Convention.

W. C. Newton presented the report on the Orphanage as follows:

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Orphanage at Thomasville has developed so rapidly that it has become one of the most prominent institutions in the State, and one of the most successful Baptist training schools. Its objects are: To furnish homes for the homeless children of Baptist parents, and to this end there have been built five cottages which accommodate, though inadequately, 175 children, who are arranged in families; to give an elementary education to each one through the medium of their excellent school; and to train each child in some industrial

craft which will enable them to earn a livelihood. Above all there is an earnest endeavor to inculcate Christian morals and Baptist principles.

Your committee rejoice at the increasing zeal manifested by the Sunday Schools of our Association, but fear that there is a tendency

to entrust this charity too entirely to the children.

· SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

New Bern, N.C., October 11, 1899.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. B. Boone.

The roll of churches and messengers was called.

- W. T. Bilbro presented the following for Committee on Order of Business: Meet at 2.30 p. m.; Sunday Schools at 3; Home Missions at 3.30; Periodicals at 4.30.
- A. H. Harnly, for Committee on Petitionary Letters, recommended that Oriental Church be received in this body. The report was adopted.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

C. W. Blanchard, Chairman, presented the report of the Executive Committee, which was received, as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

In many respects the same difficulty has confronted the Executive Committee during the last year that has been common in the history of the Association—too much destitution for the men and means at hand to supply it—but all in all the work has been more satisfactorily done than before. The Board of Missions is expending this year \$1,590 on our territory, an advance of more than \$500 over last year, and this has enabled us to put two new men on the field, Rev. M. P. Davis at Lagrange and in Greene County, and Rev. W. H. Dodd in Carteret County to help Rev. R. D. Carroll.

In every place the needs are great and many, and the encourage-

ment is such as to warrant a larger effort in the future.

A SUMMARY OF THE WORK.

Rev. J. W. Rose removed in the beginning of the year from Lagrange to Goldsboro, and assumed the care of Second Church, Goldsboro, a mission in North Goldsboro, Falling Creek, Mount

Calvary, Emmaus, Seven Springs and Union churches. Good meetings were held during the year at each of his churches with varying results. As many as forty-five were added to the roll of his churches, and the spiritual condition of them all is good. Sunday Schools are kept open in all his churches, and some of them have Woman's Missionary Societies at work. It will be seen from the report of his churches that their liberality has been enlarged to all the conventional objects. Brother Rose has set a fine example as a missionary by acting as colporter on his field and scattering an abundance of

denominational literature.

He received aid from the Board of Missions to the amount of \$150. Rev. M. P. Davis lives at Lagrange and serves Lagrange, Snow Hill, Castoria and Eureka churches. In addition to these churches he has cultivated five mission points, viz: Mayo's School House, five miles north of Eureka, a point just within the Greene County line from Eureka; Taylor's School House, two miles from Snow Hill in a southwest direction; William's School House, about six miles north of Castoria, and Gurganeon's School House near Lagrange. The churches under his care are all in fine spiritual condition, unless it be Snow Hill, and a good outlook is before them. at Castoria deserves special mention. The little church is just one year old, but it is a healthy baby. Twenty-five were added to its membership as the result of a meeting held there this summer, and still others will join of its result. It will soon be self-sustaining and liberal in its support to the Convention. Eureka has taken on new life and opens new promise. Lagrange is not a mission church, but is generous in helping to form a compact work in her destitute environments for a pastor and missionary. It is hoped that this church will want preaching two Sundays in the month another Thirty-three have been added to the membership of pastor Davis's churches during this year. All the missions cultivated by brother Davis this year are promising, and must be cultivated another year. Another missionary will be needed to take part of Elders Rose's and Davis's field. The Board helps this field \$115.

Rev. J. B. Jackson. -By the generous gifts of a few of the members of the Kinston Baptist Church, brother Jackson was employed in midsummer to do special work in Lenoir County, without charge to the State Board. He serves New Hope and Dover churches and the following promising out-stations: Cobb's Mill, about five miles southeast from Kinston; Sandy Bottom, about ten miles south of Kinston and midway between New Hope and Union churches, and Herring's School House, about five miles west of Kinston. At Sandy Bottom, as a result of a special meeting, ten were baptized, and it is likely an organization will be needed there soon. The work that brother Jackson is doing is very important, and we commend it to the further consideration of the Board. He is a worthy young man and wise planner and good preacher. His is the extending of a work before cultivated by the pastor of the Kinston Church.

Rev. R. D. Carroll occupies the Carteret County field as he did a year ago, and has had for a part of the year the help of Rev. W. H. Dodd. The points cultivated are about as they were last year, with sufficient encouragement to warrant a larger effort another year. Davis, Smyrna, Woodville, Leary and Marshallberg are constituted churches—the last two named yet to become members of the Asso-The work in Carteret has been strengthened this year by ciation. the help of the voluntary missionaries who have labored there, and some additions have been made to the membership. No better man in all the State could be found for this work than brother Carroll, and he deserves all the help on this field that he may ask. In the

judgment of the committee a big effort ought to be made in this county during the next associational year. Some opportunities will not wait for us, and we believe this is true here. For the support of brethren Carroll and Dodd the Board appropriated \$450 in Car-

teret County this year.

Rev. Joseph Aden is on the Pamlico County field, and serves Truitts, Bayboro, Vandemere. Bay Creek and Oriental churches, the last named being constituted by him during this year. A misfortune, for which our missionary is not accountable, has hindered our cause in this country, but by wise management and push we shall yet move on. There are a number of out-points cultivated by brother Aden in connection with his churches, and are bidding in their prospects. In the absence of a definite report from the missionary, we are unable to give particulars of work. The Board was to help this field at the rate of \$200 per year. It would be a wise expenditure if the Board could put a helper to brother Aden on

this field another year.

Rev. C. B. Paul is our efficient missionary in Onslow County. Like a brave soldier, he is fighting the battle wisely and courage-ously. The work on his field has been more especially that of development. The great ingatherings on this field during the last year have given special need for indoctrination and encouragement. The work has been strengthened in Onslow by the faithful work of several of our voluntary missionaries. Swansboro, Enon's Chapel, Piny Grove, Bear Creek, Atlantic, Cool Spring, Capernaum and Moore's Chapel should be grouped in a field for two men another year, and their salaries supplemented by the Board of Missions. No better mission work could be done in Onslow County than the establishment of a good secondary school at Swansboro. All the encouragement possible should be offered in building up good schools in all parts of our territory.

Rev. J M Alderman is Bishop of Jones and Craven County Missions. A year ago we felt that the work was too much for one man, but did not see the forthcoming of means to add the extra man. He serves Spring Garden, Fort Barnwell. Trenton, Polloksville and Maysville. While there has not been large ingatherings on this field, we trust the work has held its own and is in good condition for two men to take up another year and press on to greater success.

Rev. W. L. Bilbro is in charge of Ayden and Winterville churches with some mission points in Pitt County, the location of which we are unable to give. We have had no report from the missionary in charge and are unable to make suggestions, about the field or its

outlook.

Brother Simpson of Beaufort and brother Oliver of Swansboro and brother Aman of Marines, have done some work during the last year in the borders of the Association that is worthy of consideration, though they were not under the employment of the Board. In Beaufort County Rev. J. N. Booth, the former pastor at Wash-

In Beaufort County Rev. J. N. Booth, the former pastor at Washington, did some preaching without expense to the Board. In a letter he most earnestly commends this work to the Board's consid-

eration.

One thing impresses your committee as being most important to our future success, viz: that we should arouse the churches of our Association to see the opportunity of the hour and seize upon it before it is wasted. A larger conception of our duty; a larger liberality to sustain the work; a firmer hope in the promises of Him who said, "Go," and "Lo I am with you always" will lead us to sure and speedy victory.

A. W. Setzer offered the report on State Missions:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

During its history the State Mission Board has been the agency under God and the churches for having the gospel preached at more than 3,000 destitute points in our State, at which 550 churches have been organized and houses of worship built, and into the fellowship of which have been baptized not less than 30,000 souls. It is impossible to estimate the far-reaching effect which the work of our missionaries has had upon every department of our denominational life.

Your committee rejoices to report that our State Mission work this year is the largest and most successful of our history. We have one hundred regular missionaries in the field, supplying the destitution at 358 points in 69 counties of North Carolina. In addition to these we have our volunteer mission corps, composed of one hundred and twenty of our ablest pastors who are supplementing and reinforcing the work of our regular workers.

In western North Carolina in the territory of the former Western North Carclina Convention we have one general missionary and six district and local missionaries. God is blessing our undertaking there richly, and despite obstacles, we will see great things from our

work.

The Board of Missions was instructed by the last Baptist State Convention to increase its appropriations to \$20,000 this year. The Board has done this. It is therefore necessary, if we avoid a debt, that our churches increase their contributions to State Missions \$5,000. Up to the present date the receipts for State Missions indicate that we will needs have to appeal earnestly to every church for an extra collection. We are glad to report from the Corresponding Secretary of the Convention that the Associations throughout the State have increased their pledges for next year 33 1-3 per cent.

We arge this Association to do likewise. In view of the fact that we have so much need of assistance in our mission work, we should encourage the Board to help us liberally by coming up liberally ourselves to the support of the Board. We therefore urgently insist that it is the duty of each church in this Association to increase its

pledge to State Missions.

Jackson, of the Lenoir field, in the vicinity of Kinston, and J. M. Alderman, of the Jones County field.

The Association was then addressed by John E. White, Corresponding Secretary of the State Convention. Pledges were taken for State Missions amounting to \$377 (see table) and the report adopted.

It was moved that the Association continue its session through to-morrow. Adjourned to meet at 2.30 p. m.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Joseph Aden.

The report on Sunday Schools not being in the house, the report on Home Missions was called for, and was presented by C. B. Paul, as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has under its care the frontier mission field, beginning at the Kansas line, and running southward to the Rio Grande and along the river to the Gulf of Mexico. This territory is about one thousand miles long by five hundred miles broad, and embraces within its area some of the most productive lands on the continent. It is being rapidly settled by a sturdy, enterprising people, who are laying the founda-tions of a great civilization. When we take into consideration the advantages that an early occupation of this territory would give us, we feel impelled to say that a proper denominational pride, to say nothing of higher and holier objects, should urge us as Baptists to see to it that the Southern Board shall not be crippled in its noble efforts to meet this great demand by a lack of cooperation on our part. The neglect of the eastern portion of our own State by the Baptists of North Carolina, tells us too plainly what we may expect if we fail to meet the opportunities of this field as they present themselves.

In addition to this field and the work in the large cities among the foreign population, and the great mountain section, which at this time is attracting such wide attention, we have before us a wide open door into Cuba. Shall not the same enthusiasm which swept over our country a few months past, in behalf of this down-trodden race, inspire every true Baptist of our Southland in their effort to give these people, along with political freedom, that free-

dom which shall make them free indeed?

Can we not see that God in His providence, by giving us Diaz and his corps of native helpers, has committed the spiritual welfare of this island to the Baptists of the South? Let every Baptist of the Atlantic Association decide what part he will play in this great work.

In comparing the statistics of last year with those of the present, it is gratifying to note the marked increase in every department of this great work. The number of missionaries employed this year is 653, against 467 last year. Baptisms this year 6,552, against 4,739 last year; additions to churches this year 12,983, against 9,509 last year. The amount raised and expended on the field this year is

\$65,818.81, against \$54,251.04 last year.

Thus in spite of the declaration of war and the shock it gave to business, the excitement which followed the sailing of fleets and marching of armies, the dread of fever and other contagious diseases brought back by returning soldiers, the low price of agricultural products, the long icy winter and stormy spring, we have made material progress all along the line, for which our hearts should swell with gratitude to the Giver of all good.

It is also pleasing to note the increased interest in this work manifested by our noble women. In this, as in every other good work, the sisters by their zeal and sacrifices are far in the lead.

Through the Woman's Missionary Union they are doing a work, the results of which eternity alone can measure. They contrib-

uted through this union last year over \$24,000 wor,h of supplies. May these encouraging facts inspire us to grander and nobler deeds in the years to come.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your committee beg leave to submit the following report:

Last year twenty-eight churches reported a total of: Scholars, 1,990; officers and teachers, 253; total, 2,243. Library books, 540. Contributions (all objects), \$856.02.

Sixteen churches did not report. There are in this Association 2,789 church members therefore, and only 2,243 members of Sunday Schools if we consider the unreported churches as having no

Sunday Schools.

While it is a fact that a clurch may exist without a Sunday School, it is also true that no church has a normal growth without one. The action of our State Convention a few years ago in putting into the field a State Secretary for Sunday School work is the wisest step taken in late years, and will be productive of the very greatest good to the Baptist cause in the State. Whoever holds the youth of a country holds its future also.

Your committee would commend in the highest terms the work of brother J. W. Rose in his own district and do earnestly recommend that Bro. B. W. Spilman be requested through the State Board to spend more of his efforts within our bounds, as the field

is certainly the most ready for results within the State.

J. B. Jackson presented the report on Unrepresented Churches:

REPORT ON UNREPRESENTED CHURCHES.

The Committee on Unrepresented Churches reports Maysville Church for the lack of interest and no representation, and as all the other churches of this county intend joining with the new Association, we recommend this church go with them. Cool Springs for the same reason (lack of interest) failed to send messengers. Piny Grove (Jones County) sent three delegates with its letter, which was either lost after being handed in, or not handed in. Bayboro, Bay Creek and Vandemere's pastor resigned some time before delegates were to be selected, and hence no doubt the reason they had no representatives.

Resolved, That in consequence of a resolution adopted at the last meeting of the Atlantic Association looking to a division of this body, and asking the privilege of a conference of churches in Lenoir, Jones, Greene, Wayne and part of Pitt counties to meet at Fort Barnwell, such meeting being held, the opportunity be now given said churches to ask for letters of dismission through their representatives.

SECOND DAY—Evening Session

Devotional exercises were conducted by W. C. Newton.
The Committee on Place and Preacher submitted the following report, which was adopted:

Place, Morehead City; Preacher, A. H. Harnly.

The report on Foreign Missions was presented by A. H. Harnly, as follows:

Last words of a friend are always sacred, and frequently of the utmost importance. The last words of our Friend of friends, our Elder Brother, Christ, should be especially sacred to us. So far as recorded they are these: "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Spirit is come upon you, and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost

part of the earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of age."

That all nations may be taught, the Foreign Mission Board has been constituted, and the Foreign Mission work has been organized. Under the direction of this Board men and women of heroic mould and devout spirit have given and are giving themselves, a living sacrifice that the cospel may be presched to avery greature.

mould and devout spirit have given and are giving themselves, a living sacrifice, that the gospel may be preached to every creature. Christ has graciously fulfilled His promise. He has been with them from the beginning. He is with them now. The harvest of the past year has been especially gratifying—845 were baptized—the best record in the history of the Board. And yet what are they among so many? Old fields everywhere are calling for enlargement. From new fields comes to us the Macedoneau cry for help. Shall this call and this cry go unheeded? Shall we be content with the little we have been doing, with the mite we have been giving, or shall we in the name of God resolve greater things for the future than we have done in the past? The fields are indeed white unto harvest, and the laborers are few. But there are others who stand ready and are saying here am I; send me. By our enlarged gifts let us do our part toward sending them, and the blessing will be ours as well as the heathen's.

After remarks by A. H. Harnly. John E. White and W. Carey Newton, pledges were taken (see table), and the report adopted.

During the discussion, a collection was taken for State Missions amounting to \$14.18.

H. B. Duffy reported the following order of business for to-morrow:

J. B. Jackson submitted the report on Obituaries:

REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

Bro. John D. Davis, of Beaufort, fell on sleep on February 17, 1899. Brother Davis had been a zealous and faithful member of the Beaufort Baptist Church for a long time before his death. He was a leader in many things. But for him the Baptist cause in Beaufort would have suffered greatly during the years that have passed. He was a pillar in the Baptist Church there. He loved to support his

pastor and give to missions. He was sent by his church as a delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention when it met in Raleigh, and to the State Convention when it met in Goldsboro. He was loved and honored by all his brethren, and highly esteemed by all who knew him. Our cause in Carteret County loses greatly by his death.

Bro. J. M. Wooten, of Kinston, passed away during the year. Brother Wooten was a pioneer Baptist in the Eastern Association for a long time before the Atlantic Association was formed. At the time of his death he was a deacon of the Kinston Church. He was a strong Christian and loyal Baptist. In the day when our cause was weak in his section, he unfalteringly maintained the faith once for all delivered to the saints. Brother Wooten was a Baptist for more than fifty years, and was active in the meetings of the denomination. The existence of Baptists in Kinston to-day is, in some

measure, due to his power and influence. We cherish his memory. Bro. John H. Eaton, of Morehead City, passed away soon after the last session of the Association. He was one of the charter members of the Association, and was an active worker until his death. He was a great help to the Baptist cause in Morehead City, and was for some years Clerk of the Association. He was a liberal supporter of his church and pastor, and every worthy object found in him a friend. Brother Eaton was a young man when he died, but even in the short period which he lived he had established a well-rounded Christian character. He was a true Baptist. Peace be to

his ashes.

Bro. C. J. Nelson, of Goldsboro, was gathered into the garner on high in the early part of this year. Brother Nelson was for a long time a pioneer Baptist preacher in the eastern counties of the State. He helped to establish several churches and helped to build several houses of worship. He strengthened our cause in the days when it was too weak to stand alone. He was never a prominent pastor, yet he did a work that was far-reaching as the work that any of the pastors have done. He preached at Washington, Greenville, Snow Hill, and reorganized several churches after the war. He was a good financier, and offered his service freely to the cause, and was a leading spirit in the establishment of the First Church of Goldsboro, and was the first Superinteendent of Sunday Schools in Wayne County. Much of his preaching was done as supply for churches that did not have regular pastors. Out of the deep charity of his heart, he always responded to the calls of the needy.

S. M. Brinson presented the report of the Finance Committee, which was adopted. The following is a summary of the report: State Missions, \$102.69; Home Missions, \$9.12; Foreign Missions, \$12.00; Education, \$17.90; Orphanage, \$30.42; Ministers' Relief, \$7.52; Minute Fund, \$32.95; unassigned, \$15.15; total, \$227.75.

On motion, the report of the Woman's Meeting, auxiliary to this body, is ordered printed in the minutes.

Emmaus. The following pledges were taken for Sunday School Missions: Morehead City, \$10: Tabernacle \$10: Middle Street \$10: Oregon \$1: Swansboro (pledged by H. B. Duffy) \$5; total \$36.

Adjourned with benediction by Joseph Aden.

THIRD DAY -EVENING SESSION.

The Association was led in prayer by N. B. Broughton.

On motion, the Clerk is allowed the usual fee of ten dollars for his services.

M. P. Davis offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks and hearty appreciation of the delegates and visiting brethren who have attended the session of this Association are due, and are hereby tendered, to the Baptists of New Bern for their kindness and genuine hospitality during our stay among them.

Hight C. Moore presented the report on Education:

Your Committee on Education submit the following:

1. We believe in Christian Education, that of which Christ is the center; the voluntary principle in the maintenance of higher education, and the duty of the State to expend its available educational funds for the education of its 600,000 children of school age.

2 We conceive it to be the duty of all Christian parents to give their children a good preparatory education. The young men seeking collegiate training we recommend to Wake Forest College, which is now doing the best work for the largest number in all its distinguished history; and to young ladies the new Female University, which has just opened at Raleigh with an able faculty, a large student body, and flattering prospects. Our young ministers should be encouraged to take a course in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

3. There are three phases of our educational work which demand liberal gifts from the churches: our Fémale University at Raleigh, that its equipment may be complete and its accommodations extended; the Board of Education at Wake Forest, which helps young ministers to secure a collegiate education; and the Student's Aid Fund, of Louisville, Ky., which enables needy young ministers to

enjoy seminary training.

4. It is the opinion of your committee that we need within our bounds one or more first-class academies under the auspices of the Association. We suggest, therefore, that the Executive Committee be requested to take this matter under advisement, investigate the field, and report on this subject at the next meeting of this body.

After discussion by C. W. Blanchard and N. B. Broughton, the report was adopted.

The churches were requested to give as much as last year to education.

Closing remarks were made by H. B. Duffy, S. M. Brinson, C. W. Blanchard, J. W. Rose and M. P. Davis, and the Association adjourned to meet in Morehead City Thursday after second Sunday in October, 1900.

- 1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."
- 2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members. Every church having a Ladies' Missionary Society shall be entitled to one additional female delegate to represent it on the Woman's Central Committee.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom by securing the co-operation of its churches for their edification and for the spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body: and churches desiring to be received must signify their acquaintance with it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality: (2) the name of its pastor. clerk, clerk's post office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor: (3) Sunday or Sundays of regular service: (4) the church statistics: (5) Sunday School statistics: (6) contributions to (a) Associational Missions. (b) State Missions, (c) Home Missions, (d) Foreign Missions, (e) Education, (f) Colportage, (g) Sunday School Missions, (h) Orphanage, (i) Ministerial Relief, (j) Houses of Worship, (k) Minute Fund, (l) other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions inquiry shall be made for the cause: effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or dropped from the Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator. a Clerk, a Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator, in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body, the Historian in keeping a record of the work and progress of the Association, and report at each annual session.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of five, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its objects. The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and dis-

bursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and details of their work.

- 10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Wednesday morning after second Sunday in September, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory Sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.
- 11. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches

designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.

The Clerk shall provide blank letters for the use of the

- churches of the Association previous to the meeting of the Association, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them and have it present at each annual session, read the proceedings of the preceding session at the beginning of each morning session, and the last day's proceedings at the close of the annual session.
- Members desiring to speak shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term 'brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

Members shall not absent themselves from the session without

permission.

The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be in-

vited to seats, with privilege of speaking but not of voting.

9. A copy of the Minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one copy to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia, and one to the Field Secretary for Sunday Schools in North Carolina.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by

"Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law."

The report of the Executive Board and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

called Association to order.

A. N. Harnly presented report of Executive Committee as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The office of the Executive Committee, as at present constituted. is largely a perfunctory one, and therefore the committee, so far as its own work is concerned, has very little to report. During the year three missionaries under appointment of the State Board have labored within the bounds of the Association: Bro. Joseph Aden (has occupied) on the Pamlico field; Bro. R. D. Carroll, the Carteret field, and Bro. C. B. Paul, the Onslow field. Faithful and effective work has been done on all these fields. Special meetings have been held in many of the churches and substantial progress has been made during the year. For a detailed account of their work the committee refers the Association to the reports of the missionaries themselves. Moore's Chapel is at present supplied by Bro. E. B. Simpson. In Onslow County Bro. J. B. Olive, recently ordained, has taken the pastoral charge of three churches and will, in addition, supply one or more mission stations. An appropriation should be asked of the State Board for this field. The one condition which most impresses itself upon your committee is the large amount of territory which remains uncultivated. If the ministerial force of the Association were doubled the field could not be covered as it should be. If it were possible to make the necessary arrangements for his support, we believe it would be wise to put an associational missionary into the field, who should have no regular appointment but should devote himself entirely to mission and evangelistic work in these destitute places. It has been suggested also that a closer relation should exist between this committee and the Association's missionaries, that they should be appointed by the committee subject to the endorsement of the State Board and that pledges be taken and money be raised by the churches directly for Associational missions, such money to be expended by the committee in distinctly Associational work. The Committee submits this suggestion to the Association for consideration.

During the year more or less enquiry has been made into the advisability of establishing an associational school. Definite steps have not yet been taken looking toward that end. Your Committee would recommend the appointment of a permanent committee to whom this matter may be referred for action. It is with sincere regret that we report the resignation of two of our pastors. Bro. Aden resigns the Pamlico field, upon which he has labored faithfully, earnestly, and effectively. This field presents many problems. It is probably the most difficult field in the Association, and it is hoped that a man strong in the Lord and in the power of his might may be found to succeed Bro. Aden. Bro. R. D. Carroll also resigns the Carteret county field, where he has done noble work for the Master. This is a very important field and we trust the Lord will soon send

the man who can continue the good work begun there.

It seems to your Committee that the supreme need of the hour is a fuller realization on the part of the churches themselves of the responsibilities which rest upon them and of the opportunities for fruitful missionary work which lies right at their doors. This need not long remain a destitute field, if only in the name and the fear of the Lord we will dare to undertake great things.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The Baptist cause in North Carolina is largely what it is, and the Baptists occupy the position they do, through the work of the State Mission Board. Many of the churches which are now strongest and contribute most freely to the various interests of the Convention, were, in their early history, fostered and largely supported by the State Board. Hundreds of weak churches are now dependent upon it for help and with this help many will soon be able to stand alone and support others. It is of the utmost importance, therefore, that the work of the State Board should be liberally supported. Last year about \$21,000 were appropriated, and then many deserving calls for help had to be refused. New fields of work are constantly opening and new demands on the Board being made. There must, therefore, be no decrease in contributions, but on the contrary there should be a very material increase.

For over half a century "The Biblical Recorder" has vigorously contended for the faith which we profess and zealously aided every denominational enterprise.

In addition to this—the organ of our denomination—we recomend "The Atlantic Messenger," which is our associational organ, "North Carolina Baptist," "Charity and Children," "Foreign Mission Journal," "Our Home Field," and the literature handled by the Baptist Book Store, Raleigh, N. C.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday School is the Church at work in the special study and teaching of the Scriptures. It is one of the mightiest agencies for the spread of the truth and for the establishment of the Kingdom of our Lord. There is, or should be, in every church a live,

energetic Sunday School beating at its very heart.

We are glad to learn that there has been some progress in the Sunday Schools of our Association, and we hope it is only the beginning of yet larger work in the near future. There are, however, a few church letters reporting no Sunday School statistics, and the supposition is that they are without Sunday School organizations. It is to be hoped that not only every Church shall have an evergreen Sunday School for its own benefit, but also that several neighboring points may be so occupied. For the Sunday School is a forerunner of churches as well as their indispensable ally.

Your committee would also most heartily commend to the prayers and liberality of our churches the splendid work being done by Rev. B. W. Spillman, the Field Secretary of our Baptist Sunday

Schools in the State.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has undertaken to supply all the destitution in the Southern States with the gospel of Jesus Christ. The number of missionaries employed this year is about 675, and about \$72,000 is needed to pay the salaries of these men. There have been about 7,000 baptisms on the field this year. God in his providence is opening new doors and laying new responsibilities upon us. The frontier mission field of the Home Mission Board begins at the Kansas line and extends to the Rio Grande and on to the Gulf of Mexico. This territory is a thousand miles long. The Board has done work in all of the Southern States. A number of missionaries in North Carolina have been helped by this Board. To support Home Missions means to support the Gospel any where in all the unoccupied territory of the Southern Baptist Convention and in Cuba. Your Committee would recommend that this Association raise at least \$150 for this object during the coming year.

WHEREAS, The Atlantic Association adopted Rev. C. B. Paul as its beneficiary on Board of Education at Wake Forest College, furnishing the means for his support during a period of five years; and

Whereas, Bro. Paul has shown himself most worthy of the Association's beneficence by his earnest, faithful, effective, and self-de-

nying labors as a missionary in our bounds; therefore.

Resolved, that we request the Board of Education to cancel the notes given by Bro. Paul to the Board for a period of three and a half years, amounting in all to about \$250.

This Resolution was unanimously adopted and the Clerk instructed to correspond with Board of Education.

Report on Education read by C. B. Paul as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education submits the following report: We believe that the public school system of our State should receive the hearty support of every member of this body. First, because in some instances our public schools furnish the only opportunity for the instruction of many of the children of our State. Second, because

as a denomination we feel it our duty to aid our State in every

worthy enterprise.

The necessity for increased interest in our public schools it seems to us is more urgent, if possible, than ever before, because of the recent amendment to our State constitution whreby in a few years the privilege to vote will be tested in some instances by an educational qualification. We are also of opinion that the length of the school terms should be increased. If this can be done in no other way, we feel that the influence of this body should be exerted toward the gradual withdrawal of appropriations now made by the State to higher education, and the amount withdrawn turned into the public school fund. We also recommend increased interest in secondary education. By this we mean high schools and academies which occupy the middle ground between the public schools and our colleges. We feel that we should exert ourselve to the utmost to establish a school of high grade within the bounds of this Association, said school to be owned and controlled by the Association. Until this is done, we recommend to the brethren and sisters of this Association the school recently established by the brethren of the Neuse Association. In regard to higher education we rejoice in the fact that we have in Wake Forest College a school for our boys second to none in all the South. In cheapness, in morality, in wholesome Christian influence, as well as in thoroughness of instruction. Wake Forest College has but few equals in all the land, and we earnestly urge upon every young man, who has in him a desire to make the most of life, to avail himself of the opportunities offered by this noble institution. Its influence upon the Baptist ministry of North Carolina can be seen in every section of the State and we recommend to the churches that they continue their contributions to ministerial education.

To our girls we recommend the Chowan Baptist Institute, Oxford Seminary, and especially the Baptist Female University located at Raleigh. This noble institution, as well as Wake Forest College, has been established amid the prayers and tears of our Baptist fathers and mothers, and its bright future causes our hearts to swell with

thanksgiving to the Giver of all good.

This Board is located at Durham, N. C., with W. C. Tyree as its President and J. F. McDuffie as its Corresponding Secretary. Its work was begun under the auspices of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, May 3, 1890. So far as the Committee can learn there has been no change in the Board or beneficiaries during the past year. Your Committee recommends that this Association urge upon the churches composing this body to contribute as liberally as possible to the support of this Board.

REPORT ON UNREPRESENTED CHURCHES.

Your Committee finds that the Oregon and Maysville Churches are not represented, but finds no reason why this is true, unless it be

for lack of interest in the Master's cause. These churches were not represented a year ago. Your committee recommends that the Executive Committee of this Association take the Maysville Church into consideration, and learn why it has not been represented for the past two years and whether the church is in full fellowship and sympathy of this Association or not. And if it finds that it is not convenient for the church to co-operate (and work) with our Association recommends that the cnurch apply for a letter of dismission from our body and join the Neuse Association from which it has to be supplied with preaching.

The committee recommends that the Oregon church be treated in the same way as the Maysville Church by the Executive Committee, except that this church be urged to co-operate with whatever

Association is most accessible.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance respectfully beg leave to submit the following report. We, the children of the Most High, whose souls have been cleansed by the precious blood of Jesus and now enjoy the happy privilege of following our blessed Redeemer, do sincerely believe that one of our high achievements in this world's failures, triumphs, and joys, is the great art of holy living. Knowing therefore that intemperance is a great curse to humanity, a sin against God, and a dangerous temptation to the coming generation, we humbly recommend that all who have taken up the responsibilities of church members (should) absolutely abstain from the intoxication of strong drink, the use of opium, e'c., and thus present their bodies a living sacrifice unto the Lord Jesus Christ. The soul that is cast upon this sea of conflict and passion will be shipwrecked even in a calm. We hope that the ministers and pastors who in a peculiar way have been called to be leaders of the churches will preach against the great sin of intemperance and the sale of intoxicating drink, and lead all people into fuller and sweeter harmony of God's love. We ask the members of our churches to seek help from God to exterminate the use and sale of intoxicating drink and live a holy and consecrated life before God and our fellowmen.

H. C. Moore next read the report on Orphanage as follows:

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

Your committee would call attention to the following facts as given by an Orphanage representative: We have 180 children under the care of the Orhanage at the present time. By the end of the year the number will probably be increased to 200. The Orphanage is run with the strictest economy. The total cost of maintaining a child (and this includes the salaries of the employees and all other expenses) is a little less than \$5.00 a month. The work done at the Orphanage is thorough and practical. Half the day is spent in the school room and the other half in useful labor. The children are taught that it is not only honorable but necessary to work with their hands.

There is a body of land containing 318 acres connected with the Orphanage; corn, wheat, potatoes, vegetables, oats, and hay are

raised on the farm.

The boys do a large share of the farm work, the girls are taught domestic duties, and all are required to work. The property of the Orphanage is estimated to be worth \$30,000. A splendid new building for children from 5 to 8 years of age has just been completed. This building cost \$2,200, and most of the money was provided by our noble family—the late Dr. R. D. Fleming of Warrenton, and his wife.

About ten thousand dollars are required to meet the present expenses of the Institution, and there are hundreds of Orphans in

North Carolina without shelter and bread.

We have only one source of revenue—the Baptist people of North Carolina. We would urge our churches to increase their contributions to meet the enlarged demands of the work, and would especially recommend that each of our churches hold a Thanksgiving ser-

vice and take a collection for the Orphanage.

We would also call attention to the reduced rates at which "Charity and Children" is offered to Sunday Schools and commend the paper for its real worth, and also for the revenue it brings to the Institution. Special contributions are now being taken and solicited for the erection of the Mills Memorial Building which is designed to give the children industrial education. We commend this object to the liberality of all our churches, and urge that we do our part toward the erection of this most suitable monument to the father of Orphan work in North Carolina.

Report discussed briefly by H. C. Moore and adopted. Pledges made the same as for last year by vote of Association (see table).

Report on Obituaries read by H. C. Moore as follows:

REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

Your committee finds by reference to the various church letters that during the past year nine of our churches were unvisited by bereavement. Ten churches lost one member each, while two churches report three deaths each. So in all there have been sixteen of our number summoned into the presence of the Lord. It is fitting that special mention should be made of Bro. H. B. Duffie, of the Tabernacle, New Bern. On the 12th day of last April he passed away at the age of 42, in the apparent noon tide of his life and in the midst of a most active career. He was a man of immense energy, of thorough devotion to his church, and of influence in the councils of his denomination. At the time of his death he was trustee of W. F. College and of the Baptist Female University. The Association joins his family and church in mourning his departure.

Morehead City, N. C., October 21, 1900.

Association met to-night at 7, according to adjournment last night. H. C. Moore preached at 11 to-day in Baptist Church. J. N. Tolar preached at the same hour in Methodist Church. A Sunday School and Young People's Union was conducted in Baptist Church at 3 p. m. by J. H. Rich, A. H. Harnly and others.

Report on Foreign Missions read by A. W. Setzer as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Southern Baptists, through their great Missionary Society, the Southern Baptist Convention, are engaged in world-wide mission enterprises. We need have mission stations in Northern, Southern, and Central China, Africa, Italy, Brazil, Mexico and Japan.

These countries represent hundreds of millions of human beings—men and women as we are—that in the darkness of superstition and ignorance of God are going down to eternal death. Do you stop to ask how does God regard the situation? The answer is to be found in John 3:16: "For God so loved the World, that he gave his only begotten Son, that every one who believes on him should not perish but have eternal llfe." The love of God was not one of mere sentiment which bemourned the lost condition of men without attempting to supply a remedy; it was an active, energetic, self-sacrificing, love one that failed not of its purpose though assailed by the combined powers of earth and hell.

There are now in the employment of the Foreign Mission Board 98 men and women. Is it not time we were praying the Lord of the harvest that He thrust forth laborers into His harvest? Listen to the words of the Master: "As the Father hath sent me, even so send I you." And again, "Go ye into all the world and preach my Gospel to every creature." Have we gone? Can we lay claim to faithful obedience to this command of our Lord? Will God hold that church or individual guiltless who fails in effort to preach His Gospel to the starving, perishing millions who have no Christ and

know no Christ?

The churches that now compose the Atlantic Association, with a membership of one thousand five hundred, gave last year the meagre sum of \$136.67 to Foreign Missions—less than one-third necessary to support our missionary. The average contribution, according to

the above figures, is less than nine cents.

Notwitnstanding, the indifference and stupidity of some, God is signally blessing the effort of His people to give the gospel to the world. The last report of the Foreign Mission Board showed that more than one thousand converts in heathen lands had been baptized at the hands of our missionaries. New men and women had been sent out to occupy new stations and to strengthen the old ones. Our God is most certainly leading us into larger things. The two greatest needs of the hour are a larger knowledge of and deeper interst in, the work of preaching the Gospel to the world. Let us stretch our arms across the sea and press the cup of salvation to the lips of earth's perishing millions.

Constitution.

This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members. Every church having a Ladies' Missionary Society shall be entitled to one additional female delegate to represent it on the Woman's Central Committee.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom by securing the co-operation of its churches for their edification and for the

spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acquaintance with it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its con-

nection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) Sunday or Sundays of regular service: (4) the church statistics: (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to (a) Associational Missions, (b) State Missions, (c) Home Missions, (d) Foreign Missions, (e) Education, (f) Colportage, (g) Sunday School Missions, (h) Orphanage, (i) Ministerial Relief, (j) Houses of Worship, (k) Minute Fund, (l) other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or drop-

ped from the Association.

8.The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, a Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator, in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body, the Historian in keeping a record of the work and progress of the Association, and report at each annual session.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of five, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its objects. The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and details of their work.

The annual session of the Association shall begin on Wednesday morning after second Sunday in September, at such place as may be chosen, an Introductory Sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute

a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a twothirds vote of the members present.

By-Laws.

1. The daily session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches designat-

ing them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall provide blank letters for the use of the churches of the Association previous to the meeting of the Association, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them and have it present at each annual session, read the proceedings of the preceding session at the beginning of each morning session, and the last day's proceedings at the close of the annual session.

5. Members desiring to speak shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the

courtesy that becomes Christians.

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission.

7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to

seats, with privilege of speaking but not of voting.

9. A copy of the Minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one copy to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia, and one to the Field Secretary for Sunday Schools in North Carolina.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by "Ker-

foot's Parliamentary Law."

11. The report of the Eexecutive Board and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12. The general order of business shall be:

(1) Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.

(2) Election of officers.(3) Petitionary letters.

(4) Appointment of committees for this session.

(5) Appointment of standing committees.

(6) Report of committees on churches delinquent at the previous session.

(7) Reports of standing committees.

(8) Reports of other committees.(9) Miscellaneous business.

PROCEEDINGS.

Beaufort, N. C., September 11, 1901.

The Atlantic Baptist Association met in its 18th annual session with the Beaufort church at 11 a. m. Devotional exercises were

conducted by Rev. J. W. Cobb.

In the absence of the Moderator, H. C. Moore, Chm. Ex. Com., called the body to order. Delegates, with letters from thirteen churches, were enrolled, many others coming in later. After the reading of letters by A. H. Harnly and A. W. Setzer, reading clerks appointed by Moderator, the following officers were elected: Moderator—S. M. Brinson; Clerk—J. N. Tolar; Treasurer—M. S. Webb; Historian—H. C. Moore.

A. H. Harnly and J. N. Tolar, committee appointed by Moderator on order of business, made the following report for afternoon and evening session:

2:30—Report on Temperance.

3:30—Report on Sunday Schools.

7:30-Introductory Sermon.

J. W. Cobb (Biblical Recorder), B. W. Spilman (Field Sec. Sunday School Board), C. W. Blanchard (Pastor church at Kin-

ston), were welcomed to seats by Moderator.

B. W. Spilman responded to the address of welcome by J. N. Tolar, pastor of the Beaufort church. The Moderator appointed J. C. Whitty to read report on Sunday Schools, the appointee being absent. The hand of welcome was extended to the new pastor on the Pamlico Field, J. R. Taylor. On motion Association adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m. Benediction by A. W. Setzer.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Association was called to order at 2:30 by Moderator. Prayer by J. R. Taylor.

Report on Temperance was read by J. B. Olive as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Believing, as we do, that intemperance is one of the greatest evils in our land, we are bound to admit that it is a great hindrance to the progress of religion. Therefore we, as Baptists, ought to unite our forces against the

use of all intoxicating liquors, opium, and everything that has a tendency

to weaken the brain and impair the health.

Therefore, be it Resolved, That we, the pastors and members of the different churches of the Atlantic Association use every effort possible to discontinue the use and sale of the same in all sections of our State. J. B. OLIVE, For Committee.

After quite a free discussion by J. B. Olive, C. W. Blanchard, A. H. Harnly and J. C. Whitty, the report was adopted.

The report on Sunday Schools was read by J. C. Whitty as fol-

lows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday School has been called the Military Academy of the Church; in it the young are to be prepared by the study of the Bible to be ready to enter into the Army of the Lord and do valiant service for Him. Perhaps three fourths, if not nine tenths, of the additions to our churches can be traced to the training and influences had while attending the Sabbath School. Therefore, we cannot too earnestly insist upon the establishment and maintenace of the Sunday School in the churches embraced in our Association. And to foster and create a more intense interest can only be had when we as individuals (and when I say we I mean every one here on this occasion) shall be so much in earnest as to not only punctually attend ourselves, but to do all in our power to influence others. It is while the human heart is young, soft, and susceptible to good influences that we should strive to impress upon it the precious truths of the Bible and the blessings of Christianity. I fear that our work in the Sunday School is too often done in a perlunctory way instead of putting our hearts into it and realizing with all the earnestness of our souls the importance of leading a soul to Christ. Brethren, there may be some things we cannot do, but this one thing we can do. We can take our Bibles and go to Sunday School, and by our precept and example help to lead others to Him who loved them and gave Himself for them.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Beaufort, N. C., Sept. 12, 1901.

Association met this morning at 9:30 according to adjournment. Devotional exercises were conducted by J. B. Newton. Moderator called Association to order and welcomed the following brethren to seats: S. F. Conrad (N. C. Baptist) and L. Johnson (Cor. Sec. of Baptist State Convention).

Minutes of vesterday were read and approved. Pledges for Sun-

day Schools were made, amounting to \$45.00.

In the absence of a written report on Periodicals, the discussion was entered into without the report. J. W. Cobb, B. W. Spilman, S. F. Conrad, H. C. Moore and A. W. Setzer addressed the Association respectively—for Biblical Recorder, Sunday School Board Literature, N. C. Baptist, Atlantic Messenger and Foreign Mission Journal.

H. C. Moore read report of Ex. Com. as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Association requires of its Executive Committee a fourfold work: (1) the prosecution of Associational Missions; (2) such other work as the body may refer to them; (3) co-operating with the State Mission Board in supplying our destitution; and (4) whatever action between annual meetings may seem to them advisable. Furthermore in the report of the Board must be included an account of its proceedings, the report of the Treasurer, and a review of the Mission work of the Association.

In accordance with these instructions we beg leave to submit the following report:

I. THE WORK SINCE LAST ASSOCIATION.

1. The first work of the Committee was to map out our territory, ascertain the need, and seek to supply it as fully as possible. The various fields, operating on a minimum basis, asked for outside aid amounting to \$900. These requests were endorsed by a majority of the Committee, laid before

the State Board and granted without any reduction.

2. With the close of our last Associational year two of our most important fields were left pastorless by the removal of pastors Aden and Carroll from the Pamlico and East Carteret Fields, respectively. An interval of several months elapsed in each case before the Committee acting with the churches and the State Board was able to secure their successors. But it esteems the Association fortunate in securing the services of two consecrated young men: Bro. J. R. Taylor for the former and Bro. N. L. Gaskins for the latter.

3. In accordance with the instructions of the Association relative to effecting an arrangement with the State Board whereby State Mission funds raised in our churches should be expended at home, the Treasurer has received and paid out by advice and apportionment of the committee to the

Missionaries, the sum of \$148.27 during the year.

4. The request of the Convention Committee that the Atlantic Association raise \$2500 of the proposed \$100,000 fund for Education in N. C. having been referred to us, the following advice was given: Since in our churches about \$1,000 had been contributed to similar funds just before this movement started, and now that a school is proposed under the auspices of this Association, therefore it was advised that the Association seek to raise the amount apportioned on condition that it be applied to the proposed school.

5. Several members of the Volunteer Mission Corps who agree to hold meetings for expenses have operated in some of our destitute sections

during the past season.

6. The Committee has encouraged the organization of Sunday Schools in Churches not having them. At least two, and probably more, schools

have been started.

7. The indebtedness of the Maysville church was looked into by the Committee two members personally visiting the town for inquiry and conference. We regret to say that the conditions under which pledges were made to cancel this debt have not as yet been met: That is, the \$50 each to be raised by the Maysville church and the Neuse Assocation have not been raised. However, we asked the churches to raise the amounts pledged or to hold themselves in readiness to do so. We are gratified that several have recently responded and it is our hope that the title of the property will be made satisfactory and the debt canceled in the near future.

II. UNREPRESENTED CHURCHES

To the Committee was referred last year the matter of investigating the condition of two churches which had failed of representation either by letter

or messenger for two years or more.

(1). The Maysville church is part of the Jones county field now belonging to the Neuse Association. It has been regularly supplied with preaching, being now in the temporary care of Rev. S. E. Garner. It also has a S. S. under the superintendency of Bro. J. E. McCutchen, who though not a member of the church is yet a zealous Baptist recently come from South Carolina. The paucity of members, especially males, the irregularity of church conferences, the oppression of the church debt, the struggle for existence in the midst of a primitive atmosphere, together with an indifference more of oversight than design, have caused the lack of representation.

The Committee expected the church to be certainly represented at this session but is again disappointed; it is due possibly to unsettled conditions from

recent pastoral changes.

(2) The Oregon church is in Beaufort county, is a part of the field now occupied by Rev. J. H. Rich, and is in the territory embraced in the Tar River Association. The church was at the point of collapse when early last year Rev. J. S. Corpening, of Washington, began preaching there once a month. Later he held a meeting resulting in seven baptisms and the reestablishment of the church in regular order. Since then there have been signs of progress, the painting of the church building, the securing of regular preaching by Bro. Rich, and five other accessions during the present year. The Committee is glad to report that the church is represented this year both by its pastor and a hopeful letter.

III. OUR MISSIONARIES AND THEIR WORK.

The pastors of twenty-two of the twenty-four churches in the Atlantic Association have required outside aid in order to their support during the year. As at present constituted our Mission work falls into ten sections,

five groups of churches and five individual churches.

1. THE ONSLOW FIELD, in charge of Rev. C. B. Paul, includes our Churches at Swansboro, Atlantic, and Enon Chapel; Bro. Paul also serves the church at Jacksonville which is in the Eastern Association. It was at first designed to include Piney Grove, but later this was transferred to the care of Bro. Olive. Only Atlantic received help from the Board; the amount was \$25. The work there is difficult but substantial progress has been made.

2. THE ONSLOW-CARTERET FIELD, embracing three churches in Onslow—Bear Creek, Capernaum, and Piney Grove—and one in Carteret—Cool Springs is under the pastoral care of Rev. J. B. Olive. An appropriation of \$25 was granted to each of these churches. The Capernaum and Cool Spring Churches have been engaged in building during the year.

3. THE PAMLICO FIELD has been in charge of Rev. J. R. Taylor since the 15th of March, 1901. It includes five churches: Bayboro, Bay Creek, Oriental and Vandemere in Pamlico, and Truitt in Craven. The appropriation to this field was \$250 The three last named churches are without houses of worship. Active efforts are being put forth for the erection of

a building at Oriental.

4. THE EAST CARTERET FIELD now includes three churches—Marshalberg, Smyrna, Davis and one mission point, Atlantic. For more than half the year this field was pastorless but the first of July Rev. N. L. Gaskins was secured and since then has been doing regular work. The Marshalberg church is struggling to build its house of worship. At Atlantic the house secured some years ago by Rev. W. N. Johnson is now dilapidated and the title either is misplaced or was not secured. The appropriation for the field was \$175.

5. THE BEAUFORT AND WOODVILLE CHURCHES are under the ministry of Rev. J. N. Tolar. The former was granted an appropriation of \$100 and the latter \$25. The work at Beaufort was never in more hopeful condition in all of its phases while Woodville, to which Bro. Tolar gives one Saturday night and one Sunday morning service a month is taking on new life. In this work is also included the North River Mission where a colony of Baptists was discovered. Bro. Tolar preaches here one Sunday afternoon in each month.

6. THE TABERNACLE, NEW BERN, under the ministry of Rev. A. H. Harnly, reports progress in the reduction of its debt, the improvement of its property, and the increase of its membership. Bro. Harnly has also preached regularly one Sunday afternoon each month at Olympia, a promising mission point four miles north of New Bern. The appropriation from the Board to the Tabernacle was \$200.

7. MOORE'S CHAPEL, five miles west of Morehead City, was granted

\$25 from the Board and entrusted to the oversight of Rev. A. W. Setzer, of Morehead City. The care of the Church has been assumed by Rev. Baylus Cade who has organized a S. S., served faithfully as its Superintendent and given the Church his ministerial services for two Sundays a month.

8. CHRISTIAN HOPE in Onslow is in charge of Rev. N. A. Shelley whose other churches lie in the Eastern Association. He preaches there each Saturday and Sunday night before the fourth Sunday. He reports that the church needs a house of worship, since now they have to worship in a free house. Appropriation \$25.

9. OREGON, as already stated, is in Beaufort County and under the ministry of Rev. J. H. Rich. Since this church was included in a Tar River Mission field, receiving an appropriation of \$300, we have not had direct

supervision of its work.

10. MAYSVILLE, like Oregon, is connected with a field in another Association (the Neuse) by which it is supplied with preaching. Therefore we can only refer to the statistics of that church for an account of its work.

To present some features of the work of our Missionaries not usually given in the minutes the following approximate tabular summary is presented:

Our needs are great and manifold: deeper spiritually and greater efficiency in churches organized; more ministers and more money to support them; a thick sowing of our territory with good religious literature, especially doctrinal and missionary; the organization and equipment of efficient Sunday Schools in most of our churches and at several mission points; and—well, where shall we stop till the cry of destitution is transformed into the shout of victory?

But the skies are brightening; if we are faithful, the coming day will be more glorious than that which was lost to our fathers. Yea, if we are

faithful!

HIGHT C. MOORE, For Committee.

tion of the Maysville church in as satisfactory a manner as possible, both in the interest of the Church and the Association.

On motion, the report on State Missions was substituted for the Doctrinal Sermon this evening at 7:30.

The Moderator supplied vacancies in Committees as follows:

On motion Association adjourned to meet at 2:30 p.m. Benediction by L. Johnson.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Moderator called Association to order at 2:30. S. F. Conrad lead in prayer. Roll of delegates was called. Moderator welcomed to a seat J. H. Rich, pastor of the Oregon Church.

The report on Orphanage was read by A. H Harnly as follows:

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville is one of the practical fruits of the religion of Jesus Christ. This institution cares for two hundred children, giving them not only a comfortable home and a parent's care, if not love, but giving them also a liberal practical education. It is not only an orphanage but an industrial school as well sending out into the world young men and women who know how to do something, and who have been taught to rely upon themselves. To support the orphanage is a work of patriotism, therefore, as well as a work of Charity. It makes far better citizenship. Extensive permanent improvements have been made during the past year, in enlarging buildings and especially in the erection and equipment of the Mills Memorial building. These improvements have greatly enlarged the usefulness of the institution. The work of greatest importance now in hand is the completion of a thorough system of water works and sewerage. The cost of these imperative improvements will be about three thousand dollars, of which only \$828.19 had been paid in when the Treasurer last reported. It is the opinion of the Committee that every church in the Association, which has not already done so, should without delay make an appropriation for this purpose. The security of the lives of these children may depend upon the speedy completion of this work. Additional buildings are urgently needed for the accommodation of the many applicants for admission for whom room cannot now be made. This work must depend largely upon men of means and consecration, and it is believed the Baptist of North-Carolina are not wanting in such. The Committee urges that every Sunday school in the Association observe "Orphanage Sunday" once a month, and in order to increase the schools interest in the orphanage, use in the school as many copies as possible of "Charity and Children," the best paper of its kind published. It is a sentiment maker and a purse opener, and should be given the widest possible circulation. A. H. HARNLY, for Committee.

A. H. Harnly, A. W. Setzer, J. C. Whitty spoke to this report.

A cash collection for the water works was taken, amounting to \$10.00. The report was adopted.

The report on Education was read by H. C. Moore as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

There are four phases of denominational education which claim our consideration, sympathy and support:

1. Preparatory. For primary education and preparation for college or practical life we commend unhesitatingly and earnestly the Associational

School soon to be opened at Morehead City.

2. Collegiate. For young men. Wake Forest College is one of the first institutions in the land. It has been an untold blessing to North

Carolina Baptist through all the years of its history. Never so strong or efficient as now, it heartily deserves our patronage and our prayers.

3. Collegiate. For Young Women. No school for girls in our State has risen so rapidly, secured so many friends, and done so magnificent a work in proportion to its years as the Baptist Female University of Ratical Control of the company of the company

leigh. Unreservedly it is to be commended to our people.

4. Theological. The best opportunities for the training of the Ministers in our Southland are afforded in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary of Louisville, Ky.

H. C. MOORE.

The report was adopted after pledges had been made amounting to \$65.50. (See table.)

On motion Association adjourned until 7:30.

SECOND DAY—EVENING SESSION.

Moderator called Association to order promptly at 7:30. Hymn —"All Hail the Power of Jesus Name."

Report on State Missions was made by H. C. Moore as follows:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Our State Mission work in North Carolina attempts the solution of three great problems: The relief of denominational destitution in the East, the supply of the factory population in the Piedmont section and educational work in the mountains. It should be said that the Home Mission Board co-operates with our State Board in the mountain work and has 27 missionaries in the factory towns. We have now about one hundred missionaries in the employ of our State Board. In addition, 50 young women have been sent to teach in the mountains, each agreeing to give two months free, the Board bearing only their expenses.

The Convention instructed the Board to plan out operations for this year on a basis of \$25,000. This was done and the work is moving forward most encouragingly. But up to date the Treasurer is able to report only a little over \$6,000 paid in; so that we must raise nearly \$8,000 a month, or we must report a debt at Winston in December. This can easily be done if there is concerted action: for we have a thousand churches contributing

to this work. Yet there are 595 that show no financial interest in the work of the Board,

Surely any other churches in this State could be sooner excused from contributions to this work than those in our territory. First of all, we are in the midst of a destitution which calls loudly for the most generous aid. And again, we are recipients of help from the State Mission Board to the extent of \$900 for this year; and we could wisely expend \$1200 next year.

In view of the Board's increase in appropriations and the need of yet further enlargement, we most earnestly urge our churches to increase their contributions to State Missions at least 25 per cent. for the coming

year.

HIGHT C. MOORE.

Pending the motion to adopt this report, Rev. L. Johnson, Cor. Sec., delivered a stirring address on mission work in the State. The report was then adopted.

On motion the Ex. Committee was instructed to co-operate with the Cor. Secretary in any special plans he should devise for the additional development of the benevolent objects of the Convention.

A cash collection for State Missions was taken, amounting to \$5.20. A. W. Setzer read the report on Home Missions as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, Ga., is a creature of and is fostered by the Southern Baptist Convention. The work it has done and is now engaged in doing may be divided into three distinct but vitally connected classes:

1. Preaching the Gospel.

Establishing and fostering educational enterprises.

Building churches.

These features of work go hand in hand in every locality in which the

Board operates.

The following summary of work done last year will give an idea of the vastness of this enterprise; Missionaries 811; churches and stations, supplied, 2,660; members received, 13,800; churches constituted, 162; houses of worship built and improved, 209; Sunday schools organized, 511; amount of money received by the Board, \$91,075.11.

The field of our Home Board embraces all the States south of, and including Maryland, Kentucky and Missouri, together with Oklahoma and Indian Territories and the Island of Cuba. The Board divides its work into

MOUNTAIN REGIONS, FRONTIER WORK, FOREIGN POPULATION, WORK AMONG THE NEGROES, WORK IN CITIES, AND CUBA.

The work of the Home Board is basal, and is important in that it prepares the way and lays the foundation upon which the denomination must build, and develops and fosters weak and important enterprises in many of the Southern States.

Some one has said that, "Home Missions have always been the source of supply for all other missionary and educational enterprises." It is clear to every one that we cannot hope to enlarge our efforts abroad until we have developed our home resources, and no one will deny that the enlarged activity in Foreign Missions is in no small degree the result of the work of the Home Board.

MOUNTAIN REGIONS.

The territory thus denominated embraces parts of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky and Alabama. This

work is, for the most part educational. The majority of these mountain people are Baptists, but they need more and better schools, a better educated ministry; and if these are not supplied, it is only a question of a few years when these mountain sections of our country can be no longer reckoned as Baptist strongholds.

FRONTIER WORK.

By frontier work we do not mean now what was once meant by that term. Years ago this work was largely, if not chiefly, among the Indians. Frontier work now means, mainly, to furnish the gospel to our own people who have flowed in great tides from the older States to the West and South-west frontiers of our Southern country. Taking the advice of Horace Greely: "Go West, young man, go West" large numbers of our own people have settled along these frontiers and are without Gospel privileges. The Secretary of the Board has said that every dollar the Board receives could be used in this work and then the need would hardly be supplied.

FOREIGN POPULATION.

There are now several millions of foreigners living in the territory embraced by the Southern Baptist Convention and the number is increasing every year. We are bound to be affected by their foreign ideas and modes of life, unless we meet them with the gospel. They must be evangelized or our free institutions will be imperiled.

WORK IN CITIES.

Strong appeals are being made to the Board for aid in the work in our large cities. Our State Boards are unable to do this work unaided. These cities are and will be sources of a great stream of influences socially, politically and religiously, hence the vital importance of this department of the Board's work.

WORK AMONG THE NEGROES.

In the territory embraced by the Southern Baptist Convention there is a negro population of about eight millions. What will become of them—rather what will become of us if they are not reached with the gospel? The Home Board in co-operation with a number of State Boards and the Home Mission Society has engaged in what is known as a New Era Institute work. This effort has proved a great blessing to these people.

CUBA.

This is the day of opportunity with Cuba. The great bulk of the population of this Island must be looked after by the Home Board or nothing will be done for them. Appeals were made and Southern Baptists gave liberally for Cuba while it was yet under Spanish tyrrany, and accompanied their gifts with a prayer for a more open door. When patience was exhausted, our nation rushed to arms and poured out the blood of our soldiers together with the treasuries of our country to free Cuba. Cuba is free. The doors are wide open for the Gospel Messenger and the evangelization of these people lies largely with Southern Baptists. To successfully prosecute this work, the Board must have contributions and men.

NORTH CAROLINA AND THE HOME BOARD.

For many years the Home Board has aided North Carolina in her mission work. Many of our strongest and most liberal churches attest the liberality of this Board to us. Since our Convention has acquired new territory by the union of the two Conventions at Greenville in 1898, our dependence on the Home Board has been increased. Nobly has this Board come to our help by such increased appropriations as the leaders in our denomination thought proper to suggest.

In the language of the late and lamented Secretary of the Home Board "let us not level down any other enterprise but level up the work of Home

Your Committee desires to express in this report its deep sorrow occasioned by the death of Rev. Franklin H. Kerfoot, D. D., L. L. D., the honored and efficient secretary of the Home Board.

A. W. SETZER, for Com.

Pending the adoption of this report B. W. Spilman, Field Sec. of the Sunday School Board, delivered an inspiring address on Home Missions. The report was adopted.

- J. H. Rich made a few remarks concerning his work; after which the following order of business for to-morrow was adopted:

A. M. 11:15—Report on Ministerial Relief Board.

A. M. 11:45—Miscellaneous Business.

P. M. 7:30—Doctrinal sermon.

P. M. 8:15—Report on Foreign Missions. P. M. 9:30—Closing exercises.

On motion Association adjourned to meet to-morrow at 9:30. Benediction by A. W. Setzer.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Beaufort, N. C., Sept. 13, 1901.

Association met according to adjournment at 9:30 a.m. Devotional exercises were conducted by A. W. Setzer. Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

On motion the time for the report on Associational School and for that on Ministerial Relief were interchanged, thereby making the report on Ministerial Relief come at 10 a.m. and that on Associational School at 11:15 a. m.

J. N. Tolar read the report on Ministerial Relief as follows:

REPORT ON MINISTERS' RELIEF.

This Board is located at Durham, N. C., with W. C. Tyree, President and J. F. McDuffie, Corresponding Secretary. It began its work under the aus-

pices of the Baptist State Convention, May 3, 1890.

The object of this Board is to aid Baptist Ministers who, having given their lives as living sacrifices on God's altars of service, find themselves in old age dependent on their brethren for support. They have largely laid the foundations upon which we are to-day building.

Your Committee earnestly recommends that the churches increase their contributions to this important object. Last year (1900) the Atlantic Association gave \$59.50. For this year (1901) we pledged \$81. I trust that our contributions will show that we have gone far beyond this amount.

For the sake of common gratitude, but greater than this, for the work they have done, but greatest of all, for the sake of Him who sent them into the world to do his work, these worn out Soldiers of the Cross should have our sympathy and liberal support. Respectfully submitted, J. N. TOLAR.

After remarks by J. N. Tolar, A. H. Harnly, C. W. Blanchard

and J. C. Whitty the report was adopted.

Pledges for Ministers Relief were made, amounting to \$78. (See Pledges for Home Missions were made amounting to \$130.50. Pledges for State Missions were also made amounting to \$350.00.

The report on Associational School was read by H. C. Moore as follows:

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL SCHOOL.

We your Committee appointed at the last annual session to establish, if possible, a school of high grade under the auspices of the Association beg leave to submit the following report:

1. Immediately after appointment we invited bids for the school. In several quarters there was a desire for it and in two towns there was ear-

nest endeavour to secure it.

2. About the last of April of the present year the committee decided unanimously in favor of the Morehead City location.

3. Deeds to four valuable lots well located and worth about \$600 were transferred to the committee for the Association.

4. Subscriptions to the building fund were solicited amounting to about

5. It was decided to open the school September 17, 1901. Suitable quarters were engaged (till our own building can be erected) at a rental of \$6.00 per month.

6. Rev. A. W. Setzer was chosen Principal for the opening year. He is to have two competent lady assistants. The prospects for the opening of

the school are bright.

In conclusion the Committe would urge the importance of the school to our denominational life in this section. It appeals to all our churches for their prayers, their influence, their patronage and their financial aid. The matter now pressing is the erection and equipment of a commodious building on the lots we have secured. Such a building as the Committee has planned would cost about \$1500.00. By all means let it be erected before the close of the present year and the work will then be on a permanent basis.

Remarks were made on this report by A. W. Setzer, C. W. Blanch-

ard and J. C. Whitty.

Under the head of Miscellaneous Business A. W. Setzer was appointed to preach the doctrinal sermon at the next session of Association.

A. H. Harnly, N. L. Gaskins and S. P. Willis were appointed a Committee to nominate Trustees for the Associational School.

On motion it was decided that the Board of Trustees should be composed of 12.

Committee on Place and Preacher reported Bayboro the place and J. N. Tolar preacher. This report was adopted.

On motion the Clerk was instructed to communicate the regrets

of the Association to brethren W. J. Montford and C. B. Paul at their inability to attend on account of sickness.

H. C. Moore was appointed Associational Member of the State

Board of Missions.

The Colporter question was discussed but nothing definite determined. The Ex. Com. was instructed to look further into the advisability of putting a colporter in the field.

The report on Foreign Missions was read by A. H. Harnly as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The measure of unselfishness in the spread of the gospel is Foreign Missions. There may be a degree of selfishness in the motive which prompts contributions to the maintenance of the home church or the prosecution of Associational, State or Home Missions. To some extent at least the contributor expects to and does share in the advantages accruing. But Foreign Missions is disinterested benevolence. The work of the

But Foreign Missions is disinterested benevolence. The work of the Foreign Board has never been more prosperous, nor more hopeful. The high water mark—contributions was reached last year and notwithstanding the serious interruptions of the work in China there were during the year 1,009 baptisms on our Foreign Field. Twenty-one (21) new missionaries were appointed during the last convention year and a number of appointments have been made since the Convention met in New Orleans. The instructions to the board last year were to enlarge. The instructions this year are to enlarge, and the instructions next year will be to enlarge. They must continue so until the world is won for Christ, or until Christ comes and relieves us of the commission: "Go preach the gospel to every creature." If we of the Atlantic Association are loyal Missionary Baptists, then, we will hold up and strengthen, to the extent of our power, the hands of our Board in its every forward movement in this work of works—the preaching of the gospel in the uttermost parts of the earth and the winning of souls for Christ.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Duncan McLeod of Bel-

haven.

In the absence of the officers of last year the following temporary officers were elected; A. W. Setzer, Moderator, and Hight C. Moore, Clerk.

Letters were presented from a majority of the churches in the Association and read by Duncan McLeod and J. R. Taylor who were chosen Reading Clerks.

Permanent organization was effected by the election of the following officers: Moderator—A. W. Setzer; Clerk and Historian—Hight C. Moore; Treasurer—M. S. Webb.

The following were appointed a Committee on Order of Business: Duncan McLeod, A. A. Butler and J. R. Taylor.

Louis Thomas and O. F. Davis.

The morning session adjourned with benediction by W. F. Fry.

FIRST DAY—Afternoon Session.

On reassembling the Association was led in prayer by J. E. King. Petitionary letters being the order, a letter was presented announcing the organization of Spring Hill Baptist Church in Ouslow county and requesting admittance into the Association. The letter was referred to a committee consisting of D. McLeod, A. A. Butler and W. F. Fry.

The following Committees were appointed by the Chair:

To nominate Executive Committee: J. C. Whitty, Alexander Trott and U. C. Holton,

To nominate Delegates to the State and Southern Baptist Conventions: T. J. Mitchell, I. B. Willis, Alonzo Miller.

Obituaries: A. A. Butler, John E. King, and H. W. Barbour,

Pastor W. A. Jenkens of the Methodist Church was at this point recognized and welcomed.

The report on Periodicals was submitted by J. B. Olive as follows:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

One of the most potent factors in the development of the masses of the people is the printing press. Too much stress cannot be put on getting the people to receive into their houses that class of literature that develops at the same time the mind and soul. Not a little of our denominational progress has been due to the denominational press. Every effort should be made to get our people to take and read this literature. We therefore recommend to the public Our Home Field, Foreign Mission Journal, Charity and Children, the Biblical Recorder, North Carolina Baptist and Atlantic Messenger.

Remarks were made by J. W. Cobb representing the *Biblical Recorder*, A. W. Setzer representing the *North Carolina Baptist*, and Hight C. Moore representing the *Atlantic Messenger*. The report was then adopted.

A. W. Setzer presented the report on Education as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The zeal of Baptists has hardly been more marked along any other line than that of education, as witness, the Orphanage, Wake Forest College, Baptist Female University, C. B. F. I., the numerous Associational schools and private schools under Baptist management. It is evident that Baptists are theoretically and in point of effort in favor of educating the people.

Your Committee presumes, however, that this report is intended to be in the especial interest of the Board of Education, located at Wake Forest College, and charged with the responsibility of educating indigent young men called of God to the gospel ministry. Possibly no contributions, made by North Carolina Baptists have yielded larger returns than those that have been put into the training of young men for the ministry. The future of our denominational life and position depends very largely upon our denominational ministry—"Like priest, like people." The call of this Board is therefore peculiar and pressing.

Your Committee desires to express its approval of the action of the Board

in discontinuing the custom of "taking notes" from its beneficiaries.

A. W. SETZER, for Committee.

The report was spoken to by A. W. Setzer and further discussion was deferred till after the sermon to-night.

Duncan McLeod offered the report of the Committee on Petitionary Letters which was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON PETITIONARY LETTERS.

We your Committee to whom was referred the petition of Spring Hill Church, having examined into the condition of the same, and finding the same to be consistent with our views, recommend that it be received into the fellowship of this Association and that the hand of fellowship be extended to the delegates by the Moderator.

The Moderator appointed the following writers of reports to take the place of absentees: Home Missions—Duncan McLeod; State Missions—John E. King; Sunday Schools—I. B. Willis; Temperance—A. A. Butler.

On motion, the Clerk is instructed to have an advertisement of Atlantic Institute, our Associational School, inserted on the back of the minutes.

Pledges were taken for Ministerial Education amounting to \$68.50. See Table I.)

The Association adjourned till 7:30 this evening. Benediction by Duncan McLeod.

FIRST DAY—EVENING SESSION.

According to appointment the Introductory Sermon was preached by A. A. Butler of Beaufort, on "The Church the Pillar and Ground of the Truth." 1 Tim. 3:15.

At the conclusion of the sermon the subject of education was resumed and an address made by W. F. Fry on the Baptist Female University, after which a collection was taken for the University amounting to \$4.83 and the report was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Order of Business for to-morrow

was presented and adopted as follows:

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Bayboro, N. C., September 18, 1902.

The morning session was opened at the hour appointed with devotional exercises conducted by W. F. Fry of East Durham.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved. Additional church letters were presented and read.

The report on State Missions was submitted by John E. King as follows:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your Committee respectfully ask to state: That while this phase of the Master's work should not be regarded in any wise as rivaling any other, or in any sense diminishing their claims, such is its import and character, that it demands and deserves our prayerful consideration, and individual support to the extent of our ability. Notwithstanding that in common with all other kindred lines of duty it bears many battle scars received in the conflict of opposition to our effort to plant the standard of the whole gospel in our own borders. It nevertheless abundantly wears the laurels of Divine approbation, which should give joy and inspire our every heart with hope and a fixed determination to press on in the good work to greater and grander results.

If we compare the present with the past on this line of our work we shall find that in the seventies we had but nine missionaries in the field under appointment of this Board, and so weak financially that some of these brethren had to abandon the work unpaid. Behold now, "What hath the Lord wrought?"

Last year we had ninety or more missionaries under appointment of our Board. Our statistics show that at the last meeting of the Convention to the great joy, comfort and honor of the great brotherhood, the Board was able to cancel every cent of their obligations and enter the year free of debt. This inspired the Convention to ask for \$25,000 and put 100 mis-

sionaries in the field; \$8,002.20 of this \$25,000 has been raised and three months only remain to meet the balance of this obligation.

It is for us, brethren, to say whether the Board, our servant and the Lord's agent, shall be able to meet this obligation and leave the next meeting of the Convention free, as it did last year. Shall it? We answer, Yes, by the grace of God it will. Everything else being equal, we are sure that this call of our Board shall not be in vain. Then let all, with willing hearts and ready hands respond and do our duty, that under God our beloved Baptist Zion shall not suffer the reproach of failure.

The report of the Executive Committee was submitted by Hight C. Moore as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following report:

1. In accordance with instructions given at last Association the Chairman of the Committee (with Rev. B. W. Spilman) visited Maysville and by calling at the homes of the people ascertained it to be their wish to unite with remainder of the Jones county field in the Neuse Association. A letter was therefore granted to the church to unite with the Neuse Association and the union was consummated at the last session of that body.

2. The work of Colportage having been referred to the Committee, we are glad to report that while this work has not been directly under the auspices of the Association, it has been carried on quite effectively in a private way. Bro. John C. Whitty, of New Bern, has both by gift and by sale distributed quite a supply of wholesome religious literature through our territory. About two months ago he effected an agreement with Rev. John E. King, of Wilmington, whereby Bro. King is spending his time in holding meetings and serving as colporter in the bounds of our Association. His work so far has been in Onslow and Jones counties and it has been quite successful. We heartily commend this work to the prayers and the liberality of our churches.

3. The Committee after thoroughly canvassing our mission fields asked the State Board for \$700 to supply our destitution. The Board was overwhelmed with applications and much to their regret was unable to grant us more than \$500 for the year now closing. This amount was apportioned as follows: To the Pamlico field, \$150; to the Onslow field, \$125; to the East Carteret field, \$100; to Beaufort, \$75; and to the Onslow-Carteret field, \$50. At a sacrifice, yet with marked fidelity, our Missionaries have toiled and wrought during the year.

4. There have been two changes in the personel of our missionaries during the year. Bro, C. B. Paul of our Onslow field, having accepted the call of the Southside church of Wilmington, has been succeeded by Bro. L. M. Hobbs who has been in the field about two months. And Bro, J. N. Tolar, of Beaufort, having removed to Mount Olive, has been succeeded by Bro. A.

A. Butler who assumed the Beaufort pastorate the first of last June.

5. While not the work of the Committee, it may be well to record the re-union of the Moore's Chapel Church with the mother church at Morehead City. Owing to death and removals this step was considered best for the maintenance of the property and the supply of the community with preaching.

6. The report of the Treasurer of the Association is herewith appended:

The reports on State Missions and of the Executive Committee were then adopted.

Adjourned with benediction by Duncan McLeod.

SECOND DAY—Afternoon Session.

The body was called to order by the Moderator and led in prayer by J. B. Olive.

The report on Home Missions was presented and discussed by Duncan McLeod and adopted.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS,

The Home Mission Board located at Atlanta has under its care a work of vast proportions and of very great importance. Originally its work was that of Frontier Missions, but now it includes work among the Foreign population, mountain regions, co-operative work among the negroes and the work in Cuba. Your Committee has not the data at hand now to write intelligently of each branch of the Home Board's work but this glimpse of the field, vast as it is in extent—from Maryland to Cuba and from the Atlantic to Oklahoma—suggests something of its importance and forces us to a recognition of the truth that such a work cannot be prosecuted without money. Your committee would therefore suggest that the churches be requested, as the work of the Board is increasing, to increase their contributions to this object.

The report on Foreign Missions was submitted by Needham L. Gaskins. After discussion by the writer and J. W. Cobb, D. McLeod, J. C. Whitty, W. F. Fry, the report was adopted.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention was organized in May, 1845, and is located in Richmond, Va. The purpose of the Convention in the appointment of a Foreign Mission Board, was to provide an organ of co-operation for Southern Baptists in the great work of sending the gospel to foreign lands. We have now on Foreign fields 293 Missionaries, of which 171 are native assistants. Our Missionaries are doing work in Italy, Mexico, Brazil, China, Africa and Japan. We have 139 churches on Foreign fields, with a membership of 7,821, besides 41 day schools with 1,012 scholars and 65 Sunday schools with 2,512 scholars.

During last year there have been 1,439 baptisms on Foreign fields. Since God has, is, and will continue to greatly bless our efforts in the spread of the Gospel, since the spirit of Missions is the spirit of Christ and he that hath not the spirit of Christ is none of this, since in compliance with the last great Commission, we are duty bound to carry the gospel to every land, therefore let us take fresh courage and enthusiasm in this the greatest of all great works; and let us covenant together to pray for Foreign Missions, talk Foreign Missions and give more liberally to the cause of Foreign Missions, till truth shall supplant error, till the kingdoms of this earth shall be won to God; and the glorious gospel of his blessed Son shall expel the mists of heathen darkness and light up the benighted lands with the light of Christian beauty.

Pledges were then taken for State, Home and Foreign Missions and Colportage. (See Table I.)

Duncan McLeod was given ten minutes to present the needs of the Aurora Church and take a collection for the same. The collection amounted to \$5.00.

The report of the committee on Sunday Schools was presented and discussed by I. B. Willis and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Whereas, we believe in religiously training our children to love, honor and to obey the Personal Saviour. Therefore, in the Sunday school is where the seed should be sown in the young mind. We also believe that every man and woman that loves their blessed Lord should take part in the Sunday school, old and young (we believe) for it is the first stepping stone to the kingdom. Show me a live Christian and I will show you a live Sunday school worker for in the Sunday school is where we can collect the little ones together and tell them what the Blessed Lord has done for us and that He will do the same for them if they will only trust Him. Therefore, Brothers and Sisters, attend the Sunday school regardless of age and be sure to see that your children go, and in the end we will have an extra star placed in our crown for working faithful here in this world, in the vineyard of the Sunday school.

This Board is located at Durham, N. C. W. C. Tyree is president and J. F. McDuffe Corresponding Secretary. It was organized May 3, 1890. under the auspices of the State Convention.

Its object is to support the aged Baptist Ministers who have given their

lives as a sacrifice to the cause of Christ in our State.

The widows of these old ministers are included in this great work.

Let us as Churches and pastors increase our contributions to this worthy object that those who have opened the channels of our great Baptist work in North Carolina do not suffer. They are soldiers of the cross. May they not be in want.

REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

The Moderator appointed the Standing Committees for the coming year. (See page 2.)

The roll of messengers was called and corrected.

John C. Whitty for the Committee nominated the Executive Board and the nominations were confirmed by the Association. (See page 2.)

Hight C. Moore was elected member of the State Board of Missions from the Atlantic Association.

The Association adjourned with benediction by N. L. Gaskins.

SECOND DAY—Evening Session.

The Association met at the hour appointed and was led in prayer by J. R. Taylor.

The report on the Orphanage was presented by John C. Whitty

as follows:

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

Our Orphanage at Thomasville, N. C., is now caring for, educating and preparing over two hundred orphans for citizenship to go out and fill the places in our great commonwealth. To do this and to enlarge this Institution so as to make room for the hundreds of other orphan children who are now knocking at the door of this Institution, you and I are called upon to contribute of our means to the support and maintenance of this Orphan Home, and we can't too strongly urge upon the churches of our Association the importance of taking up regular monthly collections and to urge upon the membership of these churches to come up liberally in their contributions. Remembering the words of our Lord Jesus how He said it is more blessed to give than to receive.

J. C. WHITTY, for Committee.

The report was discussed by John C. Whitty and a collection taken amounting to \$5.62, after which it was adopted.

John C. Whitty presented the report of the Trustees of Atlantic Institute as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ATLANTIC INSTITUTE.

In submitting this, our first annual report, we beg to express our gratitude to Almighty God for His bountiful blessings upon the efforts of His people to establish a Christian school.

The Board has been diligent in its efforts to carry out the instructions of this body. This Institution has been incorporated under the laws of the State; a faithful and efficient faculty of five members has been placed in charge of the school.

The second session began on the 9th of September and more than seventy

pupils have already been enrolled.

The school now occupies one of the very best and most conveniently ar-

ranged school houses in eastern North Carolina.

There is still a need which no steps have been taken to supply, viz: a dormitory to accommodate boarding pupils. This is a matter that should not be deferred longer than is absolutely necessary.

In Conclusion.

Brethren, this is your school—it is the school of the Atlantic Association. It appeals to every Baptist in the Association for their prayers, financial support and patronage.

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



Constitution.

- 1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."
- 2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the Churches connected with it, each Church being entitled to three delegates, unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members. Every Church having a Ladies' Missionary Society shall be entitled to one additional female delegate to represent it on the Woman's Central Committee.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom by securing the co-operation of its Churches for their edification and for the spread of the Gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and Churches desiring to be received must signify their acquaintance with it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a Church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any Church that neglects to preserve Gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the

Association.

6. Each Church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's postoffice, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the Church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to (a) Associational Missions, (b) State Missions, (c) Home Missions, (d) Foreign Missions, (e) Education, (f) Colportage, (g) Sunday School Missions, (h) Orphanage, (i) Ministerial Relief, (j) Houses of Worship, (k) Minute Fund, (l) other objects.

7. Whenever a Church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a Church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the Church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued until the Church be recovered or dropped from the Asso-

ciation.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, a Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator, in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body, the Historian in keeping a record of the work and progress of the Association, and report at each annual session.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of five, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its objects. The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and

disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of

service and details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Wednesday morning after second Sunday in September, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory Sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the Churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session

by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

By-Laws.

1. The daily session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their Churches

designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly-received Churches by extending to them his

right hand.

- 4. The Clerk shall provide blank letters for the use of the Churches of the Association previous to the meeting of the Association, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them and have it present at each annual session, read the proceedings of the preceding session at the beginning of each morning session, and the last day's proceedings at the close of the annual session.
- ' 5. Members desiring to speak shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session with-

out permission.

7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be

invited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9. A copy of the Minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one copy to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia, and one to the Field Secretary for Sunday Schools in North Carolina.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided

by "Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law."

11. The report of the Executive Board and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12. The general order of business shall be:

(1) Reading Church letters and enrollment of delegates.

(2) Election of officers.

(3) Petitionary letters.

(4) Appointment of committees for this session.

(5) Appointment of standing committees.

- (6) Report of committees on Churches delinquent at the previous session.
 - (7) Reports of standing committees.
 - (8) Reports of other committees.

(9) Miscellaneous business.

PROCEEDINGS.

Piney Grove, N. C., Oct. 14th, 1903.

The Atlantic Baptist Association met in its twentieth annual session with the Church at Piney Grove, in Onslow County, on Wednesday morning, October 14th, 1903. Devotional exercises were conducted by C. E. Edwards. In the absence of the Clerk, B. H. Mathews was appointed temporary Clerk. Letters were presented from the majority of the Churches in the Association and read by Brethren S. A. Starling and L. L. Leary. Permanent organization was effected by the election of the following officers: Moderator, A. W. Setzer; Clerk and Historian, B. H. Mathews; Treasurer, A. T. Moore.

The following new pastors were welcomed by the Moderator: I. N. Henderson, of Creen's Creek; C. E. Edwards, of Swansboro, and

W. H. Rich, of New Bern.

The following were appointed as Committee on Order of Business: Dr. W. J. Montfort, J. B. Olive, James Phillips. The committee

made partial report as follows:

Meet at 2 o'clock for devotional exercise; address of welcome. 2:30. Education; 4, Miscellaneous business; Thursday, 9:30, Devotional exercises; 10, report of Executive Board; 11:15, Introductory Sermon; 2 P. M. State Missions; 2:30, Home Missions; 4, Foreign Missions; 4:30, Intemperance and Miscellaneous.

The Moderator appointed the following writers of reports, to take the place of absentees: Introductory Sermon, W. H. Rich: Periodicals, C. E. Edwards: Education, Dr. W. J. Montfort: Home Missions, W. H. Rich. The Association adjourned. Benediction by B. H. Mathews.

FIRST DAY-Afternoon Session.

Devotional exercises were conducted by J. C. Whitty.

The Address of Welcome was delivered by J. B. Olive. The response to the Address of Welcome was made by J. C. Whitty.

The report on Education was submitted by W. J. Montfort, as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The zeal of Baptists has hardly been more marked along any other line than that of education, as witness, the Orphanage. Wake Forest College, Baptist Female University, C. B. F. I., the numerous Associational schools and private schools under Baptist management. It is evident that Baptists are theoretically and in point of effort in favor of educating the people.

Your committee presumes, however, that this report is intended to be in the especial interest of the Board of Education, located at Wake Forest College, and charged with the responsibility of educating indigent young men called of God to the Gospel ministry. Possibly no contributions made by North Carolina Baptists have yielded larger returns than those that have been put into the training of young men for the ministry. The future of our denominational life and position depends very largely upon our denomina-

tional ministry—"Like priest, like people." The call of this Board is therefore peculiar and pressing.

The report was spoken to by A. W. Setzer.

The roll of the Churches was called and pledges made. (See Table 1.)

A petitionary letter was read by M. E. Whitehurst from Tabernacle Church, New Bern, asking for a letter of dismission to join the Neuse Association.

Report on Aged Ministers' Relief was submitted by J. C. Whitty,

as follows:

REPORT ON AGED MINISTERS' RELIEF.

This Board is a part of the organization of our State Mission Board, and its object is to support the aged Baptist ministers who, in years gone by, have borne the burden and heat of the great work of preaching the Gospel, and are now too old and decrepit and have to depend upon the liberality of us as Baptists. The widows of these old ministers (who have gone to their reward) have also to look to us for help, and as a matter of gratitude (for we certainly owe them a great debt of gratitude) we should contribute liberally to this worthy object, that these worthy ones may not be in want in their old age.

Not a little of our denominational progress has been due to the denominational press. Every effort should be made to get our people to take and read this literature. We therefore recommend to the public Our Home Field, Foreign Mission Journal, Charity and Children, the Biblical Recorder, North Carolina Baptist and Atlantic Messenger.

SECOND DAY-Morning Session.

Devotional exercises were conducted by J. C. Whitty. After singing the Moderator called the body to order.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved. Additional

Church letters were read and approved.

The Moderator appointed the following committee: J. C. Whitty, Dr. Montfort, G. P. Anderson, to nominate Executive Committee; and I. N. Henderson, L. L. Leary, Alexander Trott, to nominate delegates to the State and Southern Baptist Convention.

The order of business was changed to State Missions from 10:45 to

11:30.

The report on the Orphanage by J. B. Olive was submitted, as follows:

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The thought that Baptist parents have a home all ready prepared for their children at Thomasville, should those children be thrown upon the charity of the world, ought to inspire the Baptist hosts of

North Carolina to rally to its support.

Those 260 children now in this home are the children of our brothers and sisters whom an all-wise Providence has deprived of their natural parents, and thus God has committed them to our care. The Orphanage has not been supported as liberally as it should have been by many of our Churches; and this neglect should be brought to the attention of the brethren and sisters of this Association. A great many, however, are always ready to respond to the calls of the destitute. Our Orphanage needs more buildings, food and clothing. We therefore recommend that one earnest brother or sister be appointed from each Church, whose duty it shall be to bring the needs of the Orphanage before the Church and Sunday School at a time most suitable during the year.

If an earnest effort is made many of the unfortunate children of our Baptist brethren in the State, who are now uncared for, will during the next associational year enjoy the advantages of the

Orphanage and the blessings of Heaven.

J. B. OLIVE, Committee.

The report was spoken to by J. C. Whitty.

The report on State Missions was submitted by W. H. Rich, as follows:

STATE MISSIONS.

Our Lord said unto His disheartened and troubled disciples: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." North Carolina is included in this great commission. Power was

promised them and they were to evangelize Jerusalem, Judea, Sa-

maria and the uttermost parts of the earth.

The great State of North Carolina is geographically divided into three great sections—the Mountain, Piedmont and Eastern. Religiously it is similarly divided so that we have mountain work along educational lines, Piedmont work among the mill population, and Eastern work in the towns and country. As Baptists we need to look out upon the great field, white and whitening, to the harvest, and address ourselves to gathering in the golden grain. Work now will count for more than it will ten years hence. Let us strike the line hard and win the day.

Our needs are many, but only three will be mentioned in this re-

port, namely:

1. "Enlightenment." Our people need to be made acquainted with the cause throughout all the State. This can be done by the pastors, if they will preach upon this work and urge our people to take the papers.

2. "Enlistment." Baptists are numerous, but, as a whole, they are unorganized and not enlisted in our great movements along

educational and evangelistic lines.

3. "Enlargement." Our cords should be lengthened and stakes strengthened. There is much unoccupied territory. Here in our own beloved Association there are great stretches of country unoccupied. Now is the day of salvation for us. "Let us go up and possess the land, for we are well able."

Our beloved Secretary of State Missions, Rev. L. Johnson, is doing a glorious and far-reaching work. He has brought to bear along all lines his splendid ability as financier and organizer. The State Mission Board is doing all it can with the limited means at its disposal to occupy the waste and destitute places. Let us take collections for this work and send to Brother Watters Durham, Raleigh, N. C. As pastors we need to press these matters—"Like priest, like people" shows everywhere.

The three great factors for righteousness in our free land are the press, platform and pulpit. Let us wield our power and the Lord, whom we owe and whom we serve, will applaud us with "Well done, good and faithful servants, * * * enter thou into the joys of thy Lord."

WILLIAM H. RICH.

W. H. Rich preached the Introductory Sermon on State Missions. J. C. Whitty and N. J. Montfort spoke to the report. The roll of Churches was called and pledges were taken as follows. (See Table 1.)

John C. Whitty presented the report of the Trustees of Atlantic Institute, as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ATLANTIC INSTITUTE.

In submitting this, our first annual report, we beg to express our gratitude to Almighty God for His bountiful blessings upon the efforts of His people to establish a Christian school.

The Board has been diligent in its efforts to carry out the instructions of this body. This institution has been incorporated under the laws of the State; a faithful and efficient faculty of five members has been placed in charge of the school.

The second session began on the 9th of September, and more than seventy pupils have been already enrolled.

The school now occupies one of the very best and most conveni-

ently arranged school houses in Eastern North Carolina.

There is still a need which no steps have been taken to supply, viz: a dormitory to accommodate boarding pupils. This is a matter that should not be deferred longer than is absolutely necessary.

The report was spoken to by A. W. Setzer, principal of the Insti-

tute.

SECOND DAY-Afternoon Session.

After singing and prayer by A. W. Setzer, the body was called to order by the Moderator.

In the absence of W. H. Rich, A. W. Setzer submitted the report on Foreign Missions, as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention was organized in May, 1845, and is located in Richmond, Va. The purpose of the Convention in the appointment of a Foreign Mission Board was to provide an organ of co-operation for Southern Baptists in the great work of sending the Gospel to foreign lands. have now on Foreign fields 293 Missionaries, of which 171 are native assistants. Our Missionaries are doing work in Italy, Mexico, Brazil, China, Africa and Japan. We have 139 churches on Foreign fields with a membership of 7,821, besides 41 day schools with 1,012

scholars and 65 Sunday schools with 2,512 scholars.

During last year there have been 1,439 baptisms on Foreign fields. Since God has, is and will continue to greatly bless our efforts in the spread of the Gospel; since the spirit of Missions is the spirit of Christ, and he that hath not the Spirit of Christ is none of this; since in compliance with the last great Commission, we are dutybound to carry the Gospel to every land, therefore let us take fresh courage and enthusiasm in this the greatest of all great works; and let us covenant together to pray for Foreign Missions, talk Foreign Missions and give more liberally to the cause of Foreign Missions, till truth shall supplant error, till the kingdoms of this earth shall be won to God; and the glorious Gospel of His blessed Son shall expel the mists of heathen darkness and light up the benighted lands with the light of Christian beauty.

A. W. Setzer and C. E. Edwards spoke to the report.

W. J. Montfort submitted the report on Home Missions, as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, has under its care a work of vast proportions and of very great importance. Originally its work was that of Frontier Missions, but now it includes work among the Foreign population, mountain regions, co-operative work among the negroes and the work in Cuba. Your committee has not the data at hand now to write intelligently of each branch of the Home Board's work, but this glimpse of the field, vast as it is in extent—from Maryland to Cuba and from the Atlantic to Oklahoma—suggests something of its importance and forces us to a recognition of the truth that such a work cannot be prosecuted without money. Your committee would therefore suggest that the churches be requested, as the work of the Board is increasing, to increase their contributions to this object.

Dr. W. J. Montfort spoke to the report.

The roll was called and pledges were made. (See Table 1.)

The report on Temperance was submitted by Alexander Trott, as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

In the opinion of your committee the liquor traffic is the devil's strong arm in our land. It causes more suffering than almost any other agency of the wicked one. It is opposed to morals, Christianity, and everything that works for the peace and prosperity of our people. This being true, it becomes the duty of every one professing godliness to pray, work and vote for the prohibition of the traffic, and also for the abstinence of all the people from the habit of drinking strong drink.

The report on Sunday Schools was submitted by A. W. Setzer, as

follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Whereas, we believe in religiously training our children to love, honor and to obey the Personal Savior: therefore, in the Sunday school is where the seed should be sown in the young mind. We also believe that every man and woman that loves their blessed Lord should take part in the Sunday school, old and young (we believe), for it is the first stepping stone to the kingdom. Show me a live Christian and I will show you a live Sunday school worker, for in the Sunday school is where we can collect the little ones together and tell them what the blessed Lord has done for us and that He will do the same for them if they will only trust Him. Therefore, brothers and sisters, attend the Sunday school regardless of age, and be sure to see that your children go, and in the end we will have an extra star placed in our crown for working faithful here in this world, in the vineyard of the Sunday school.



9. A copy of the Minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one copy to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia, and one to the Field Secretary for Sunday Schools in North Carolina.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided

by "Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law."

11. The report of the Executive Board and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

The report on Temperance was submitted by J. B. Olive as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to submit the following report: We believe that the drink habit is one of the greatest hindrances to the Christian religion now in existence; therefore, be it.

Resolved, That we, the Baptists of the Atlantic Association, use every legitimate effort within our reach to suppress it and to bring about Prohibition.

J. S. Canady, J. B. Newton, C. E. Edwards, R. P. Walker and I. N. Henderson spoke to the report.

The following resolution was offered by J. B. Olive:

Resolved, That we protest against the seating of delegates from the churches that aid in the manufacture or sale of wine or spirituous liquors in any way.

The resolution was adopted.

The report on Education was submitted by L. L. Leary as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

It is very gratifying to notice the fresh impulse that education has received during the past few years. Our country districts are being supplied with a better class of teachers and the school term greatly lengthened.

On this advance movement it should be a source of pride to our Baptist people to know that our leaders have taken a very active part and our people are being more aroused to the call of

duty along the line of education than ever before.

Wake Forest College, our own institution is in better condition than ever before in all its history. We have more professors than ever before and they are better prepared. We are now putting up an Alumni Building for the better equipment for the study of Biology and medicine. The infirmary, a long felt necessity, is now a reality. A nice, well equipped building is being erected for the comfort of our sick boys at the dear old College. This should fill the hearts of our people with gratitude to those who made it possible, and most of all to God.

Our Baptist Female University is the babe of our Baptist State Convention, and we should look upon it with gratitude to God for making it possible for our girls to attend such an institution of our own. We now have nearly three hundred students enrolled there and more arriving every day. We appeal to our girls to make use of the opportunity or attending this God given institution.

Our Atlantic Institute with its good history is in fine condition. Prof. W. L. Beech, our principal is making an enviable record for himself and the school. His corps of teachers are experienced and well prepared. We now have a larger number of students than ever before at this period in the school year. There have been one hundred and ten enrolled up to the present time this year. We call upon all the brethren and sisters of this Association' to stand by this, their school. Let us give of our means and our

prayers to its support. To the boys and girls we appeal to avail themselves of the opportunity to attend this our own institute.

At Wake Forest College, we now have fifty four young preachers preparing themselves for the ministry. These young men are all poor and God has laid this work at our door for us to do. Why God calls poor boys to preach the gspel we do not know, but we do know that he calls upon us to enable them to avail themselves of an education. Let us pray for this work and do what God puts in our hearts to do.

W. H. Whitehead, C. E. Edwards, R. P. Walker spoke to report. At 7 o'clock P. M., W. H. Whitehead preached the Introductory sermon. Subject: "Let your light so shine." After which a warm and cordial address of welcome was delivered by R. P. Walker and was followed by a hearty response from J. C. Whitty.

The report on Sunday Schools was submitted by L. M. Holloway,

as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee believes that the Sunday School occupies almost the same relation to the Church that the corner stone does to the house, and that no church will be successful in its work without a good live Sunday School. Knowledge is the foundation stone upon which all real, abiding progress must rest. Therefore, the teaching department of the Church is important.

H. C. Moore, Livingston Johnston, R. P. Walker and J. S. Canady

spoke to the report.

On motion the Association adjourned. Benediction by Livingston Johnson.

SECOND DAY-Morning Session.

Devotional exercises were conducted by C. E. Edwards. After

which the Moderator called the body to order.

The roll of churches was called and church letters read by J. B. Newton and B. H. Mathews. A motion was made by R. P. Walker and carried, that the reading of church letters shall be dispensed with in the future.

The report on Periodicals was submitted by R. P. Walker, as

follows:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

Intelligent thought is the only true basis of all successful work.

The clearer the thought the surer the action.

Our cause and plan of action in anything depends largely upon how we think and what we think about it. This principal holds good in the field of spiritual endeavor as well as in the realm of secular energy.

Our thinking and acting are largely influenced by the thinking and acting of others. It is very necessary therefore that we put ourselves in touch with the best thought through the best mediums. Thus are we the better prepared for all our work, secular and spiritual.

Safe and careful reading then may be set down as one of the surest means of keeping pace with whatever progress appeals to us. And it is a matter of congratulation to the Baptist host of our State and the country at large, that we have such a splendid sys-

tem of periodicals, thoroughly consecrated to the work of the denomination, and fully equipped for sending forth that intelligence to our people that enables them to do the Lord's work with great

and telling effect.

The Biblical Recorder has long been regarded by the Baptists of North Carolina as their true exponent or religious thought, and it is a pleasing observation that its usefulness in its own peculiar field increases as it grows older.

Charity and Children is well worth a place in every home, and our people can not afford to be ignorant of our Orphanage work, concerning which this paper keeps them thoroughly posted.

The subject of Missions is stirring the religious world as perhaps never before, and the Foreign Mission Journal gives such information as intelligent Baptists can ill afford to miss.

Our varied and excellent society of Garden Galacter

Our varied and excellent series of Sunday School Literature published by the Sunday School Board at Nashville, may be relied

upon for all our needs in this department of our work.

The North Carolina Baptist and Atlantic Messenger are doing a great work in helping to keep the spirit of progress and enthusiasm alive among our people, and are the strongest forces for the cause of temperance ever telt in our State.

In a word, all the periodicals by our denomination may be heartily recommended and safely depended upon, for they are under the watch care of good and true men, called of God for their specific work.

The report was spoken to by H. C. Moore and J. C. Whitty.

A motion was made by J. C. Whitty that the Atlantic Messenger be owned and controlled by the Executive Committee of the Atlantic Association. The motion was adopted.

The report on the Orphanage was submitted by I. B. Willis as

follows:

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Orphanage at Thomasville demands at this time our special attention. Over 300 little children are placed there with no one to care for them but the Missionary Baptists of the State. The time has come when we must give and pray that God may stop the typhoid fever that is raging among them. A sewerage system is badly needed, and God's people must place one there at once. Brethren and Sisters, let us do our part in this great work.

The report was spoken to by J. C. Whitty.

A cash collection was taken for the Orphanage amounting to \$23.46.

W. H. Whitehead offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That we nereby record our especial pleasure and gratitude at the generosity of Bro. John C. Whitty, of New Bern, who in memory of his lamented daughter, has during the past year erected at our Thomasville Orphanage, "The Rowena Whitty Building" at a cost of \$3,000 and accommodating 40 orphan girls. It is a beautiful and useful memorial of a lovely Christian girl and in those walls "She being dead yet speaketh" and will speak through the coming years.

The resolution was adopted.

J. B. Olive and wife made an individual pledge for the Orphanage of \$2.00.

SECOND DAY-Afternoon Session,

After singing the Moderator called the body to order. C. E. Edwards submitted the report on Home Missions as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

From many sources have come assurances that the work of the Home Board was never more entrenched in the affections of our people and that the hour of supreme opportunity for service now confronts the Board. Our works in the different fields are having great success. The greatest work ever opened to the Board now lies before it.

L. M. Holloway submitted the report on Foreign Missions as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Missicn Board of the Southern Baptist Convention was organized in May, 1845, and is located in Richmond, Va. The purpose of the Convention was to carry out the great commission "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

The reports which come from our workers on the fields all point to brighter days. They have baptized 2,076. Let us all pray and work for the salvation of the lost.

The following brethren spoke to these reports: L. M. Holloway,

C. E. Edwards, Livingston Johnson and R. P. Walker.

J. C. Whitty submitted the report of the Executive Committee as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

This committee recommends the securing of a man to take the field as General Missionary, and a strong man for the East Carteret and Pamlico Fields. Brethren E. O. Johnson, L. M. Holloway, J. B. Newton, J. B. Olive, C. E. Edwards and I. N. Henderson have labored faithfully during the past year. Bro. C. B. Paul was doing valuable service as General Missionary when the Lord called him to his reward. We recommend that our pastors discuss State and Associational Missions before their churches at least four times during the year, in order that our people may be better informed as to their duty along these lines, and to foster and establish Sunday schools at every Baptist church in our Association. Let our people increase their liberality, which is necessary in order to build up the Lord's cause. "The Lord loveth a cheerful giver." J. C. Whitty spoke on Associational Missions.





CONSTITUTION.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the Churches connected with it, each Church being entitled to three delegates, unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members. Every Church having a Ladies' Missionary Society shall be entitled to one additional female delegate to represent it on the Woman's Central Committee.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom by secur-

ing the co-operation of its Churches for their edification and for the spread

of the Gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and Churches desiring to be received must signify their acquaintance with it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a Church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any Church that neglects to preserve Gospel order, or that treats with

contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each Church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's postoffice, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the Church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to (a) Associational Missions, (b) State Missions, (c) Home Missions, (d) Foreign Missions, (e) Education, (f) Colportage, (g) Sunday School Missions, (h) Orphanage, (i) Ministerial Relief, (j) Houses of Worship, (k) Minute Fund, (l) other objects.

7. Whenever a Church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a Church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued until the Church be recovered or dropped

from the Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, a Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator, in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body, the Historian in keeping a record of the work and progress of the Association, and report at each annual session.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of five, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its objects. The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Wednesday morning after second Sunday in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory Sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the Churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a twothirds vote of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

- 1. The daily session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their Churches designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly-received Churches by extending to them his right hand.

- 4. The Clerk shall provide blank letters for the use of the Churches of the Association previous to the meeting of the Association, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes preserve a file of them and have it present it each annual session, read the proceedings of the preceding session at the beginning of each morning session, and the last day's proceedings at the close of the annual session.
- 5. Members desiring to speak shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.
- 6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission.
 - 7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.
- 8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

 9. A copy of the Minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mis-
- sion Board, also one copy to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia, and one to the Field Secretary for Sunday Schools in North Carolina.
- 10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by "Ker-
- foot's Parliamentary Law."

 11. The report of the Executive Board and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

 12. The general order of business shall be:

 - (1). Reading Church letters and enrollment of delegates.
 - (2). Election of officers.
 - (3). Petitionary letters.
 - (4). Appointment of committees for this session.(5). Appointment of standing committees.

 - (6). Report of committees on Churches delinquent at the previous session.
 - (7). Reports of standing committees.
 - (8). Reports of other committees.
 - (9). Miscellaneous business.

First Baptist Church, New Bern, N. C.,

October 11th to 12th, 1905. The Atlantic Baptist Association met in its Twenty-second Annual Session with the First Baptist Church of New Bern, N. C., October 11 to 12, 1905.

REPORT ON DELINQUENT CHURCHES.

This committee finds that three churches were not represented at the last session of the Association, viz: Bay Creek, Cool Springs and Oregon.

We learn that Bay Creek has sold their property and divided the money. Cool Springs is left with but two members.

Oregon was careless.

We also learn that the following churches were represented only by letter: Atlantic (Onslow) and Atlantic (Carteret), Bayboro, Christian Hope, Oriental, Smyrna, Truit, Woodville. We recommend that these churches be represented not only by letter but by delegation.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

REPORT ON OLD MINISTERS' RELIEF.

The Baptist State Convention elects yearly a Board consisting of nine members who are known as The Aged Ministers' Relief Board. It is the duty of this board to furnish aid to Ministers who by reason of age or disease are no longer able to earn a support for themselves and families.

This Board very wisely furnishes aid to these old ministers at their homes so that they are not required to break the ties that bind to home and loved ones. With the old or diseased these ties are especially strong. This is also the cheapest way of taking care of them, as \$50 per year is the usual amount required.

Brethren, are we doing our Christian duty with regards to these servants of God? Nearly all secret orders care for their helpless. Shall a Christian Church allow those who have been pioneers in the work and who have not only given, so unselfishly their time and talent, but all earthly possessions to the Master's cause to go begging or to suffer for the necessities of life?

May God help us to realize our obligations to these, our brethren, and to see that in minstering unto one of the least of these, we are ministering unto our blessed Savior.

REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ATLANTIC INSTITUTE.

Brethren, this is your school. It is doing fine work. It needs more of

your hearty co-operation and help. It has now enrolled 90 pupils.

Professor Beach and his faithful corps of teachers are doing their best. The institution suffers for the want of a Dormitory and the Board of Trustees do not see any way to supply the need until the present indebtedness which is about \$1,000, is paid. What has your Church done toward the payment of this debt? What will it do with your help during the coming year to dispose of this indebtedness? This is valuable property it is easily worth \$3,000. Two of its boys are now at Wake Forest College. It has possibilities that we cannot estimate. Its future is just as bright as you feel interested in it. Will you help us to make it even a greater blessing? Scores of boys and girls in the bounds of our Association ought to be in this institute to-day and our Associational pride ought to stimulate every one of us to make it the equal of any Associational school in the State. May God put it in the hearts of His people to see and realize the great importance of giving our children a Baptist Education.

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS AND EXECUTIVE COM-MITTEE.

The destitution in our Association is a great problem that grows more and more in importance as the years come and go. And as our beloved Eastern North Carolina develops as it is doing at this time we are confronted with one great opportunity as Baptists. The Pamlico Field now being developed by the building of a Rail Road is exceedingly inviting, and requires the services of a good strong preacher.

The Field between New Bern and Morehead City along the line of the A. & N. C. R. R. is appealing to us as Baptists. Bro. E. O. Johnson has been faithfully laboring in that field for the past three years—and he now feels that he must give up that work, and we will have to look out for one to succeed him should he decide to leave. The Eastern or Coast section, one of great importance, is blessed at this time by having Bro. W. G. Hall as its Shepherd and we must carefully look after its interest by keeping ...m there.

Our Onslow field is one of great importance and we are thankful for such devoted leaders as Brethren Andrews, Olive, Aman and Henderson, whose work has been signally blessed during the past year. Now, brethren, to keep these brethren and to supply others who will be so badly needed we will be called on to contribute hoerally—it will take money to do this. The brethren have the money and may God give them Grace enough to turn it loose that this dear old Eastern North Carolina may have the gospel as we Baptists believe it.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The history of State Missions is virtually the history of the rise and progress of North Carolina Baptists from the year 1720 to the present time. The work is so clearly in accord with the divine commandment and with the Spirit of Jesus Christ, that we need no argument to commend it to the Association. Since the board of State missions and Sunday school was organized our missionaries have preached all over the State and have organized hundred of our churches which are now strong and self-sustaining, and are mighty factors in the evangelization of our own State and the world. Thus as the State board has gone forward in its work every department of our denominational life has béen stimulated, Education, The Orphanage, Home Missions and Foreign Missions have largely their base of supply in State Missions. If this has been true in the past it is doubly true to day. The commercial and manufacturing awakening which is aweeping over our State is bringing hundreds and thousands of people into our bounds and especially into our towns. The eastern part of our State is awakening to a degree never known before. Now is the time of all times for the State Board to make a heroic effort to establish our faith.

We recommend that the churches make a liberal increase to State Mis-

H. C. Moore submitted the report on Home Missions as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The field of our Home Mission endeavor is the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention and the island of Cuba. Work is being done among the foreigners coming to our shores, among the 10,000,000 negroes of the South, among the 2,000,000 white people of our mountains, in our great cities, along our Western frontier, and in Cuba. In every department there is monumental need and magnificent possibility. Already gracious results are manifest and yet greater things lie before us.

During the last year we had 718 missionaries, and 10,551 baptisms. More than \$145,000 was contributed for this work. But we need to increase our efforts and enlarge our offerings. Let us therefore, make our pledges for Home Missions larger than heretofore and pray the Lord of the harvest to

send forth more laborers into the field.

B. H. Matthews submitted the report on Sunday Schools as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Progress is our motto in this work. Our aim is to bring the young people to Christ. A live progressive school indicates a church that can be depended upon for Christian work; no school, an inactive lifeless church. Hence the necessity for a good thoroughly organized school in every Baptist Church and community in our Association and in the State. On this depends in a large measure, the success of every department of our Church work. In the Atlantic Association we have 1,083 scholars on our Sunday school roll manned and controlled by 137 officers and teachers. We have an organized Sunday School Convention which meets once a year. We recommend that each Church and pastor look after all the destitution within their reach and that we give of our time, means and prayer to the Lord, in behalf of the Sunday School work.

B. H. Mathews, H. C. Moore and D. H. Green spoke to the report on Sunday Schools.

S. M. Brinson submitted the report on Orphanage as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHANAGE.

We, your Committee on Orphanage, submit for your consideration the following report:

Twenty years ago the Orphanage at Thomasville was established—with the highest expectation of many and the grave misgiving of a few.

The history of that institution has removed all doubt as to the wisdom of its establishment and the necessity of its maintenance and among its most ardent supporters to-day are numbered those who at first questioned the propriety of its establishment.

Since its opening about one thousand children have been under its care and protection and about seven hundred have gone out from its walls well equipped morally and mentally for the stern problems of life.

The fact that 75 per cent. of the children yho have been in this institution have professed faith in Christ and have gone from its shelter into active Christian service abundantly attest the religious spirit, which pervades the institution as well as the fine moral sense which is cultivated there.

The installment of an approved system of water works was made an imperative obligation by reason of the developments in the typhoid epidemic and the Trustees are to be commended for their wise provision against a recurrence of that dread malady.

Eleven thousand dollars was expended in this and the interest on this amount—about \$600 annually—will be a burden on the institution until the principal is paid.

principal is paid.

That amount could admit a number, who are now applying for admission, if it were not necessary to apply it to the payment of interest on the money borrowed.

It is therefore earnestly recommended by this Association that each Church and each individual member be urged to sacrifice—if need be—that every possible dollar be raised toward removing this burden which hampers The Orphanage and cripples its work. Respectfully submitted,

We met with the oldest church in the Association. Since 1810 the Baptists have been worshipping God in the city. This Church for one hundred years has been holding to the Truth as we find it in God's word. The work of John Brinson, Elijah Clark, Zaccheus Slade and Jones McCabe is speaking out in thunder tones in our midst. More than a century has passed since Fulcher, Brinson and Purefy suffered bonds and imprisonment for Christ's sake. They have long since entered their reward, yet their work remains in the Godly life of many of their descendants still active members of Christ's Kingdom. During this year many of our Churches have had glorious revivals. Ninety-five have been added by baptism.



Constitution.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members. Every church having a Ladies' Missionary Society shall be entitled to one additional female delegate to represent it on the Woman's Central Committee.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom by securing the co-operation of its churches for their edification and for the spread

of the Gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acquaintance with it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it; but it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve Gospel order, or that treats with

contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post-office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday school statistics; (6) contributions to (a) Associational Missions, (b) State Missions, (c) Home Missions, (d) Foreign Missions, (e) Education, (f) Colportage, (g) Sunday School Missions, (h) Orphanage, (i) Ministerial Relief, (j) Houses of Worship, (k) Minute Fund, (l) other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued until the church be recovered or dropped

from the Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, a Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body, the Historian in keeping a record of the work and progress of the Association, and report at each annual session.

- 9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of five, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its objects. The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and details of their work.
- 10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday morning after first Sunday in November, at such place as may be chosen, and an introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

Bv-Laws.

1. The daily session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches designat-

ing them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the dele-

gates of newly-received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall provide blank letters for the use of the churches of the Association previous to the meeting of the Association, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them and have it present at each annual session, read the proceedings of the preceding session at the beginning of each morning session, and the last day's proceedings at the close of the annual session.

5. Members desiring to speak shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother" in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the

courtesy that becomes Christians.

- 6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission.
- 7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to

- seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

 9. A copy of the Minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one copy to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia, and one to the Field Secretary for Sunday Schools in North Carolina.
- 10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by "Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law."
- 11. The report of the Executive Board and the missionary work of the Association shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.
 - The general order of business shall be-
 - (1)Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.
 - (2) Election of officers.
 - (3) Petitionary letters.
 - (4) Appointment of committees for this session.
 - Appointment of standing committees. (5)
 - (6) Report of committees on churches delinquent at the previous session.
 - (7)Reports of standing committees.
 - (8) Reports of other committees.
 - (9) Miscellaneous business.

PROCEEDINGS.

Davis Shore Baptist Church, Davis, N. C., October 17th to 18th, 1906.

The Atlantic Baptist Association met in its Twenty-third Annual Session with the Davis Shore Baptist church, October 17th to 18th, 1906. Devotional exercises were conducted by D. H. Green.

After enrolling the delegates, permanent organization was effected as follows: J. S. Canady, Moderator; B. H. Mathews, Clerk and Historian; J. W. Green Treasurer.

The Moderator appointed the following committees:

Order of Business—Luther Paul, B. M. Riggs, O. F. Davis. Digest—J. B. Holland, L. L. Leary, W. J. Montfort, Jr. Finance—J. W. Green, John H. Davis, D. R. Lewis.

The following committees were appointed to take the place of absentees State Missions, R. D. Cross; Orphanage, W. L. Britt; Sunday Schools, D. H. Green; Aged Ministers, R. D. Cross; Temperance, J. H. Heilig.

The following visiting brethren were welcomed to seats: R. D. Cross, new pastor of Morehead City; J. H. Heilig, principal of Atlantic Institute; W. L. Britt, from the West Chowan Association.

FIRST DAY-EVENING SESSION.

W. G. Hall submitted the report on State Missions, as follows:

THE REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

We greatly rejoice in the fruit our State Mission work has borne. If our people could realize the wonderful things accomplished by its work, it is safe to say they would be glad of the opportunity to contribute to the work of the Board. Enlargement has been the watchword of the Board since its work began, and even to-day the call comes for five thousand dollars more than was given last year, and while we have 185,000 white Baptists in the State, it seems that the amount is small (and it is little short of shameful). Therefore, we, the commtitee, ask that we have a more liberal pledge for the work of State Missions this year. Foreign and Home Missions claim a large place in our hearts, and should have the support of every Baptist of North Carolina. Yet these are founded on State Missions. Interest at home gives us a world-wide view of missions. We are glad to report that the missionaries of the State Board have had wonderful success, not only in pointing the lost soul to the Christ in salvation, but the Baptist cause has been strengthened in the destitute sections of our State, and churches have been completed and dedicated by them to the Lord, to whom shall be alf the glory forever. The State Board is the key to the situation, that has and will cause many souls to be opened to the gospel so plainly proclaimed by its missionaries. Brethren, let our prayers ever be for the redemption of our Respectfully submitted, State, and the world for Christ. W. G. HALL, for Committee.

W. G. Hall and W. A. Ayers spoke to the report.

The Moderator appointed the following committee on place and preacher: B. H. Mathews, J. B. Olive and R. L. Paul.

J. B. Olive submitted the report on Periodicals, as follows:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

Since the printing press has become one of the most powerful agencies of the land in scattering both good and evil over the entire country, it behooves us as a denomination to look well to the kind of literature that goes into homes of Baptists. Therefore be it

Resolved, That the Pastors and deacons of this Association be requested

to do all in their power to place in every home the Biblical Recorder, North Carolina Baptist, Charity and Children, also the Foreign Mission Journal and Home Field and such other literature that is calculated to improve the minds of both old and young morally and spiritually and denominationally.

J. B. Olive, W. A. Ayers and R. D. Cross spoke to the report. D. H. Green submitted the report on Sunday Schools, as follows:

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

Our Sunday school report last year stated in its opening sentence, "Progress is our motto in this work." Since that report was made, it has come under my observation that our Sunday school work has not made the progress that the work deserves. Many of the schools have even gone backward. In addition to a well-organized school in each Baptist church, we need more men and women who have the love of souls deeply in their hearts. A Sunday school officer or teacher who fails to love their God with their whole heart, soul and strength falls far short of making a school what it should be, "a soul-saving institution." We cannot but beg that our pastors interest themselves more in this great work of bringing our boys and girls into the church and to educate our church members as to the duty we all owe to our Master and Savior. Our members have not increased. Our Sunday school convention, that should be a great help, cannot do its part unless our people will attend and help by their voices and presence. God will bless us in proportion as we try and do his work. Brethren, let us be up and doing, as the fields are white unto harvest.

NIGHT SESSION-7 P. M.

After singing the Moderator called the session to order. Introductory sermon was preached by W. A. Ayers, of New Bern.

It was ordered by the Association that Atlantic Union and the Onslow

County Union unite and form one.

The Woman's Missionary Societies met in the school building at Davis Shore and held a most excellent meeting.

After devotional exercises conducted by Mrs. R. D. Cross, Mrs. Ida Eaton was elected Clerk.

Reports were read from New Bern, Morehead, Davis and Woodville Woman's Missionary Societies. Mrs. C. B. Paul made a good talk on faithfulness in the work.

Mrs. R. D. Cross read an excellent paper on "How to make a Missionary Meeting Interesting".

We hope to have a larger meeting next year at Swansboro, Nov. 5th to 8th, 1907.

By vote of the Association it was ordered that the sermon be published in the Biblical Recorder.

The Moderator appointed the following committees: To nominate Executive Committee, W. A. Ayers, W. J. Montfort, Jr., W. G. Hall. To nominate delegates to the State and Southern Baptist Convention, D. H. Green, L. L. Leary, Hub Barber.

Report on Home Missions was submitted by R. D. Cross as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The field of our Home Mission endeavor is the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention and the island of Cuba. Work is being done among the foreigners coming to our shores, among the 10,000,000 negroes of the South, among the 2,000,000 white people of our mountains, in our great cities, along our Western frontier, and in Cuba. In every department there is monumental need and magnificent possibility. Already gracious results are manifest and yet greater things lie before us.

During the last year we had 718 missionaries, and 10,551 baptisms. More than \$145,000 was contributed for this work. But we need to increase our efforts and enlarge our offerings. Let us therefore, make our pledges for Home Missions larger than heretofore and pray the Lord of the harvest to

send forth more laborers into the field.

R. D. Cross and W. L. Britt spoke to the report.

J. A. Heilig submitted the report on Temperance as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The question of Temperance is a very absorbing and vital one. We are glad to note the steady progress Temperance has made in the past few years. We rejoice in such legislation as the Watts and the Ward laws and hail with pleasure the great work being done by our Governor, R. B. Glenn, in the cause of State Prohibition.

We believe that the drink habit is one of the greatest evils with which we have to contend, and we as Baptists pledge ourselves to do all within our power to suppress it, and to bring about prohibition in our common-

wealth.

May it please God to give us the victory in conquering intemperance and every evil for His name's sake.

J. A. HEILIG, for Committee:

J. A. Heilig and W. A. Ayers spoke to the report.

The Association by rising vote adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That we, the Atlantic Association, stand firm against the liquor power.

A collection was taken to remove the debt on the Parsonage at Davis Shore.

Rev. R. D. Cross was appointed as delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention. The following brethren were appointed delegates to the Baptist State Convention: L. L. Leary, J. C. Whitty, E. C. Andrews, D. H. Green, J. S. Canady, J. W. Green. Rev. W. A. Ayers was appointed to represent the Sunday School Board of Missions.

W. A. Ayers submitted the report on Foreign Missions, and delivered a

magnificent address which stirred the Association:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our heavenly Father loves a lost world; He gave His Son to die, not for a part, but for the whole of it. He has committed to His people the work of telling those who have Lever heard of His saving love. Every Church of Christ, and every Christian is under solemn obligation to do everything possible to give the gospel to all men. The hungry hearted heathen need the bread of life. Our Lord, in great love for us and compassion for them, commands us to give them the gospel. How can we expect His blessing, if we disobey?

We are entirely too selfish. We spend too much on ourselves and far too little on the destitute fields of heathenism. Let us not do less for the cause in the homeland but a great deal more for foreign missions. Southern Baptists give, on the average, only a little over seventeen cents a year to this

work. It is a shame. If we really believe in it and would only try, we could easily average a dollar each. Let every church prayerfully try to raise next year at least as many dollars as it has members. Some churches

in the Convention raise from two to five dollars per member.

Each church ought to have its own representative on the foreign field. The weakest church can raise \$30, which will pay the salary of a native Bible woman. Other churches can raise \$100, the salary of a native preacher in China. Stronger churches can support one or more missionaries at \$600 a year. What better work could our churches do than to send to the Foreign Mission Board enough money to support one or more of these workers A number of individuals give enough to support one worker.

The Foreign Mission Board located at Richmond, Va., is a standing committee on mission work appointed each year by the Southern Baptist Convention. It does the work under the direction of the Convention and on the most economical basis. No member of the Board and no one connected with it gets a salary except those who give their whole time to the work, just as a pastor who gives his whole time to his church. The Treasurer gives only part of his time and receives pay for only the time he gives. The entire expense of managing the work in Richmond is about six cents on the dollar. Some of the State Boards make a small charge for collecting funds, but out of every dollar given to the work, ninety cents goes directly to the missionaries on the field.

The Board has now under appointment about 490 workers—190 missionaries and 300 native workers. These reported 2,446 converts baptized last The missionaries are very hopeful and enthusiastic. Great changes are taking place in foreign lands and our workers believe that soon multitudes will turn unto the Lord. Glorious revivals are reported on some The churches contributed \$324,000 last year. Southern Baptists ought to give a half million dollars this year. Every dollar of it and more could be used to good purpose. The missionaries on all the fields are begging for reinforcements. They are overworked and need help. Many well trained young people want to go. New church buildings and better homes, for the missionaries are a necessity in many places, theological schools are sorely needed for training the preachers who have been converted and called of God to preach to their own people in these foreign lands. Let us pray and work and give that these needs may be supplied.

The Board publishes the Foreign Mission Journal, an excellent missionary monthly, which gives full information about the work, at the low rate of 35 cents a year, or 25 cents in clubs of ten or more. All our people ought to take and read it. The best tracts on missions and envelopes for taking collections are furnished free to any one who will use them. Let all our churches seek to inform themselves and rally around this great work for

which our Savior died and to which He has called His people.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

When the districts, now remote and darkened by ignorance, shall have been educated so that they may appreciate the things of this life, then you will hear good things from our State Mission fields.

We need more intelligence in our religion in the Atlantic Association. In this Association we have our Atlantic Institute; in North Carolina, we have Wake Forest College and the Baptist University for Women. We owe them a debt of prayer and patronage. Let us work and pray for the early days when every corner of our State shall be educated, for it is on this plane that our denomination can do its best work.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

It would be exceedingly gratifying if marked progress could be reported in this destitute section, but candor compels this expression of regret that so little can be reported as this year's gain amid the vast destitution, which appeals so strongly to our vaunted Missionary Spirit. Our Association has suffered largely because our efforts have been more or less spasmodic and the stay of our missionaries in their respective fields—for the most part too transitory. If we could advisedly locate our men and keep them where stationed, there can be no doubt that we, as a denomination, would see decided advance made and much of the territory, originally ours, regained.

To this end, larger salaries, if possible, should be secured for them, so that they can labor zealously and continuously, unhampered by the uncer-

tainty of their support.

W. L. Britt submitted the report on the Orphanage as follows:

REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

If there is one thing that can open the heart and purse of the stingy man, it is the little child bereaved and destitute. If there is anything that can make the liberal man glad in bestowing his gifts, it is to know that his gift has been so spent that it has hushed the sobs and sighs, appeared the hunger, and sheltered and pillowed the head of the orphan child. If there is a sight that could cause angels to hush their music and peer down to earth, wishing to take part in the transaction, it must be the sight of the Christian people of our land, searching for and finding the bereaved little ones of unfortunate circumstances, and placing them in institutions where they can be cared for, educated, and made capable of serving their God better than they otherwise could have done. And if there is one thing—one institution—in North Carolina in which every Baptist ought to be interested and to which every Baptist ought to contribute, it is the Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville. This has been called the most beautiful charity in North Carolina. It is more than that. It is living mothers, fathers, brothers and sisters, gladly ministering to little children after the hands that would have ministered to them are mouldering away to dust.

Conceived and born in the heart of the colossal Jack Mills; brought into corporate being amidst the opposition of some of the leaders of the Baptist host, it has fought its way into favor, so that to-day for one to be out of harmony with the Orphanage work, is to argue himself out of agreement with all that goes to make the human heart better and life the more worth living. We are glad to say that this institution is enshrined in the hearts of our people to such an extent, that the managers need never fear that

any child therein shall ever suffer for the necessary things of life.

And now in closing this report will you allow the stranger to make some suggestions?

1. Let every church in the Association observe Thanksgiving Day and take a collection for the Orphanage. This collection will be applied on the debt.

2. Let every Sunday school take one collection each month for the Orphanage. This is for current support. Thus shall we develop our children in the grace of giving and their hearts shall be glad as they are made to know that they have helped to make some other child happy.

B. H. Matthews submitted the Historian's report as follows:

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

The twenty-third Annual Session of the Atlantic Association met with Davis Shore Church, Oct. 17-19, 1906. Davis Shore was first inhabited by a family named Davis from Wales. The first preacher that visited Davis Shore was a man named Gornto from New River in 1836. In 1840 Geo. W. Wallace held a glorious meeting in Kilby Styron's house, the result of which twenty-five were baptized. From 1844 to 1867 there was no church organization on Davis Shore. The people held their membership at Smyrna, and for 23 years they worshipped in private houses on Davis Shore.

In 1867 Jacob Utley and T. J. Leary organized the first Missionary Baptist Church. Those pioneer workers have passed over the river but their work speaks out in our midst to-day. Our work has moved along nicely in the Atlantic during the year 1906. We have had some glorious revivals and sinners have turned to the Lord. Ninety-seven have been added by baptism. Our contributions have been increased. The Lord is blessing His people all along the line.
