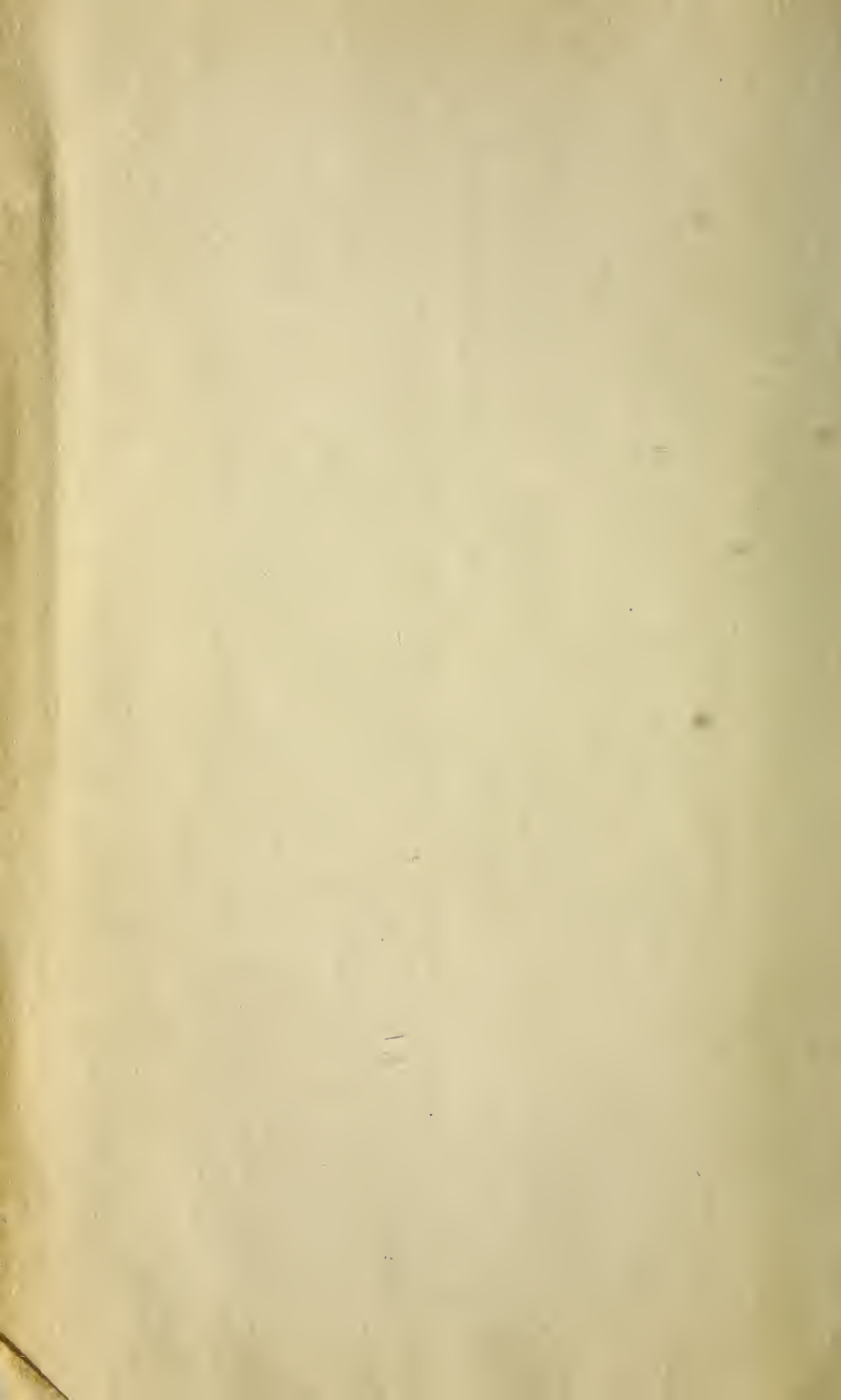

## PROCEEDINGS.

---

The Ashe Association met at Friendship Baptist church, on Tuesday at 11 a. m., Sept, 27, 1898. in its 12th Annual Session. The introductory was delivered by Eld. E. Tucker, Text, Psalms, 107:7—"And he led them forth by the right way, that they might go to a city of habitation." The Association took a recess of 60 minutes and then reassembled for business. Bro. J. H. Doughton, former Moderator, called the Association to order.

Brethren A. Brown and E. L. Wagoner were appointed tellers to receive the vote for officers who reported James Eller elected moderator, and G. L. Porter, secretary and treasurer, who accepted and proceeded to their respective duties.

On motion the thanks of this Association were tendered to the former officers.

The delegates from the following churches, viz: Grayson's chapel and Bethlehem presented letters asking membership with us, which after being read were received and hand of welcome extended to them by the moderator.

The articles of faith, etc., were read and the name Alleghany was dropped leaving this the Ashe Association.

Visiting and corresponding brethren report themselves and were welcomed to seats by the moderator, viz: J. H. Doughton and E. L. Wagoner, from Alleghany and Grayson Association; J. R. Brown, New River; J. H. Farthing, Threefork; J. Blevins and M. E. Simcox, Mt. Union.

The following committees were announced, on religious exercises: delegates of this church with John

Robertson and L. J. Sturgill; on resolutions, T. M. Duncan, E. F. Anderson, H. A. Eller; on finance, C. J. Carter, J. T. King, S. A. Campbell; on time, place and preacher of next session, R. C. Spence, J. A. Pierce and W. G. Thompson.

Committee on religious exercises report preaching tomorrow at 11 a. m. by Elders J. H. Farthing and E. F. Anderson, and at 3 p. m., by Elders I. M. Carter and N. Campbell.

On motion agreed to adjourn 'till 9 o'clock a. m., tomorrow morning and subsequent days of session, and spend half an hour in devotional exercises and begin business at half past nine.

Benediction by J. H. Farthing.

#### WEDNESDAY, SEPT. 28, 1898.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. Spent half an hour in devotional exercises conducted by Elders P. H. Harre and others.

The Association then proceeded to business.

Proceedings of yesterday were read corrected.

The letter from Clifton was read and delegates enrolled. Bro. E. C. Woodruff from Stoney Fork, reported as a visitor, and was seated.

The report of Executive Committee was read.

Discussion by H. A. Eller, T. J. Sturgill, J. H. Dough-ton and Elders T. M. Duncan, E. Blevins, I. M. Carter, E. Tucker, R. L. Shoaf, W. H. Glenn, G. W. Eller, W. F. Barker, N. Campbell, moderator, M. E. Simcox and others.

All the Elders present belonging to this Association agreed to donate ten days time or as much time as they could to the mission work in the bounds of this Association and report at next session.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

To the Ashe Association.

Bear Brethren:—Your committee has the following report to make of the present state of Mission work: At the beginning of the year we were confronted by a very discouraging state of affairs,

viz.: Much destitution and urgent necessity to occupy and cultivate points previously occupied by our missionaries, with growing demands from other points in our territory for missionary labor together with the inability of the State Convention to aid the field as formerly, and to this may be added an unwillingness to maintain and push the work on the part of some of our churches. These are some of the disadvantages under which your committee and missionaries have had to labor. Consequently large plans for the extension of the work were not laid. But, we are happy to report that some work has been done. Though it has been largely through individual sacrifices. With no spirit to dictate, your committee would urge the importance of our people, relieving to some extent, at least, the burdens unequally borne in this work. With no assurance of support your committee thought best to divide our territory (for convenience and expediency) into two fields and the work in each was offered to two of our own ministers, as a labor of love for the cause, more than the hope of gain, which offer was accepted by Elders T. M. Duncan and E. Blevins, the former in the south field and the latter in the north field with instructions to each to cultivate his field to the fullest extent of encouragement given by the churches and people, and we regret that this has been less than was anticipated. That you may be informed of their individual effort, we incorporate the substance of their reports to us in this report: Elder T. M. Duncan began work in the south field, Nov. 13th, 1897. He reports 1000 miles traveled, 177 sermons delivered. Professed conversions 52. Religious visits 109. Aided in organizing 6 Sabbath Schools. One house of worship completed and two under course of construction. Organized two churches (Bethlehem and Grayson's Chapel). Kept 6 appointments as regular as time and circumstances would allow, besides visiting all the churches in his field as often, as time would allow. He expects to close his work about Nov. the 15th, 1898. He reports our cause advanced in some localities and at a stand-still at others. Having met the strongest opposition during the past year in his experience. He reports, received from his field \$63.31.

Elder E. Blevins began work in the north field about Nov. 1st, 1897. He reports sermons delivered 106. Baptized 11. Religious visits 71. Organized 5 Sabbath Schools. One church house completed, two under course of construction. Kept four regular appointments. Looked after two out stations as much as circumstances would allow. He expects to close his work with the meeting of the State Convention. He reports the cause advanced at some points, at Pleasant Home in particular, while other localities are at a stand-still as to our work for lack of missionary labor. He thinks the work should be pushed vigorously the next year. He reports, received from his field \$9.30. Your committee comes again with the information so often furnished by the same agency, that of destitution to Baptist preaching. Will we yield the territory to others or will we struggle on? By all means let us choose the latter. Your committee recommend that a strong and

united effort be made in all our churches to work our members up to a willingness to maintain and advance their work. Pardon your committee for saying that we believe if we will become willing and anxious about this work that we will find ourselves amply able to carry Baptist principles and preaching to every neighborhood in this Association, and as our boundary is now on every side by the county line, let our effort be, Ashe county for Christ, the Baptist aiding. Submitted, H. A. ELLER, L. J. STURGILL, G. L. PORTER, J. J. GARVEY, Committee.

The report was adopted.

Chair announced preaching in the grove. Elders J. H. Farthing and E. F. Anderson preached to a large and attentive audience at 11 a. m.

The committee appointed at the preceding association to investigate the validity of church letter of 1897 from Threetop church report an error in inserting the names of delegates contained in said letter. Their report was received. The association still holds said Threetop church in good standing.

The Association took a recess 'till 1:30, p. m.

Benediction by Eld. S. Blackburn.

At 1:30 the association reassembled and proceeded to business.

In the absence of the original committee on Orphanage, Brethren G. W. Eller and J. Robertson were appointed. Committee on query from Big Laurel church, H. A. Eller and N. Campbell. Committee on colportage was supplied by W. F. Barker and J. E. Johnson. Committee to name an executive committee, R. L. Shoaf, J. M. Teague. Report on Foreign missions was read and discussed by Elders T. M. Duncan and J. H. Farthing. The Association contributed \$2.34 to this object. The report was adopted as follows:

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission work is moving on amid strong opposition. It is the Lord's work and He continues to bless it and will until all nations shall have heard of Jesus. A few years ago the prayer was for the gospel doors to be opened to the heathen. Now we see through the providence of God by men and means that is answered. To-day we have missionaries in China, Berma, Africa, India, Brazil and Japan, and still millions of souls are perishing for the "Bread of Life." Can we, who are so abundantly blessed in this gospel land, realize that we are doing our duty in this great work

of Christianizing the "heathens?" We answer no. The angels said to the shepherds: "I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be to all people." Your committee advise that the pastors of the Ashe Association indoctrinate their churches on this important work of our denomination that the good work may go on until the name of Jesus shall be glorified in all the world. T. M. DUNCAN.

The Chair announced preaching in the grove.. Elders I. M. Carter and N. Campbell preached to a large audience at 3 p. m.

Report on Home Missions was read and adopted without discussion.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

We your committee on Home Missions. desire to say the Home Mission Board is laboring to have the gospel preached in all destitute places in the United States, Indian Territory, District of Columbia and the Island of Cuba. The number of missionaries employed this year was 467 against 372 last year. Baptisms this year 4,739 against 4,709. Total additions to churches this year 9,509 against 9,455 last year. This board has done a grand and noble work in the spread of the gospel. But still there is almost constantly adding demands to this great work. The Board has frequently called the attention of the churches and Association to the needs of this great work. In the mountain district of our country we have tried in the most impressive way we could command to awaken our churches to its pressing wants. Its value to future generations has tried to be shown. Recently a new danger threatens it. The "Mormons," whose southern headquarters are in Chattanooga, have sent 400 missionaries in this district to penetrate these mountains, find access to the homes of many of our Baptist people and are winning them away from the truth of God to the acceptance of the abomination of their Christless system. What effort are God's people willing to make to preserve from the destroying power of a moral pestilence souls of multitudes of our fellow-men. The mountain region lies in the State of Va., W. Va., Ken., Tenn., N. C. and Ga. The Board is at work in every part of this field. Others who oppose us are at work there too and where we can find but a few hundreds to expend they are furnished with thousands, It is an unequal contest we are called to wage against the opposers of our faith. When will our brethren come to our help? Submitted. REV. W. F. BARKER and G. L. PORTER, Committee.

Report on State Missions was read and discussed by R. L. Shoaf, T. M. Duncan and L. J. Sturgill and was adopted as appears below:

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The design or purpose of State Mission work is to give the gospel to the destitute of N. C., establish churches, organize Sunday

Schools to aid weak churches and promote Christian benevolence among our people. The Lord has greatly blessed us in the past. Our missionaries have preached the gospel in more than three thousand places. Many thousand souls have been converted. Near six hundred churches have been constituted during even the past twenty years. Eternity alone will reveal the far-reaching result from the work done by the State Mission Board in N. C. Yet we must not make so great a mistake as to imagine that the time is come for doing less of this kind of work; for notwithstanding the vast amount of good accomplished in the past, there are more unsaved people in N. C. to-day than ever before. There are scores, yea, hundreds of places in our State in which the gospel has never been preached. The opportunity is given us, the responsibility is upon us. So let us use every effort possible to make ours a Christian State. Let us remember North Carolina belongs to Christ and the Baptist. Our Board of Missions have at present 103 missionaries under its directions. New fields continually being opened the harvest truly is great, the laborers comparatively few. So let us pray the Lord to send more laborers into His vineyard, and let us contribute more liberally to their support. We your committee would insist that the Ashe Association continue the State mission work more earnestly than ever before, knowing the above to be facts, and that the Lord will continue to bless our efforts in the future. R. L. SHOAF, L. J. STURGILL, Committee.

On motion suspended the regular order of business. The report on Periodicals was read; discussion by J. H. Farthing and Dr. S. L. Perkins, of Baltimore, Md.

#### REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

All our churches should be strong and well informed so as to become efficient in all our church work, as a means to that end we should read good periodicals, such as the Biblical Recorder and the Foreign Mission Journal. The Recorder is the organ of the Baptists of N. C., and should be patronized by all our churches it will inform us of the progress of all the departments of our church work in our convention, and will bring us into sympathy and hearty co-operation with missions, Orphanage, Sunday School work and the support of the pastors and indoctrinate the members in our faith and practice. J. ELLER, C. J. CARTER, Committee.

The report was adopted.

Committee on religious exercises report preaching to-morrow at 11 a. m. by Elders W. H. Glenn and E. Blevins. Committee on Time, Place and Preacher, report Time, on Tuesday before the second Sunday in Oct. 1899; Place, New River church, Ashe Co., N. C. Eld. W. H. Glenn to preach the introductory sermon and



Eld. E. Blevins, Alternate. After due consideration the time was changed to Tuesday before the 1st Sunday in Sep., 1899. J. A. PIERCE, W. G. THOMPSON, R. C. SPENCE, Committee.

On motion, adjourned prayer by D. S. Blevins; benediction by E. Blevins.

Thursday, Sept. 29, 1898.—The Association met at 9 a. m., spent half an hour in devotional exercises conducted by Eld. N. Campbell and others. The Association then proceeded to business. The report on Temperance was read and discussed by E. Tucker, J. R. Brown. Bro. W. C. Fields, from Alleghany and Grayson Association, was recognized and accepted a seat. The discussion was continued by E. Blevins, W. C. Fields, T. M. Duncan, G. W. Eller and J. H. Farthing. The report was received.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The sin of intemperance has and is causing more sorrow and weeping than any one sin that the Devil has introduced into this world, and we as Baptist ought to set our seal against this evil. We claim that we have thus saith the Lord for what we do, and He says, "Touch not, taste not, handle not the unclean thing." Submitted. E. TUCKER, N. CAMPBELL, Committee.

RESOLUTIONS.—In connection with the Report on Intemperance Brethren H. A. Eller and T. M. Duncan offered the following resolutions:

Seeing the encroachments upon our morals and churches made by the liquor traffic and consequent intemperance, therefore Be it Resolved, (1st), That, we covenant afresh to put forth every legitimate effort to suppress this growing evil and abstain from its use; (2nd), seeing the great destitution to Baptist preaching in our bounds, Resolved, That, we all, ministers and laymen covenant to put forth a strong and united effort to preach the gospel through our bounds; (3rd), Resolved, That, the thanks of this Association are due and are hereby tendered to its officers for the courteous and efficient manner they have conducted the business of this session; and that we return our appreciation to this church and entire community for their hospitality manifested to us at this time. H. A. ELLER, T. M. DUNCAN, Committee.

Resolutions were adopted.

The Report on Orphanage was read. Remarks by R. L. Shoaf, P. H. Harre and J. R. Brown.

#### REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

We have an institution at Thomasville known as the Baptist Orphanage. It was founded about 13 years ago. This institution has grown in the hearts of our people so that at present we have 300 acres of land with a number of magnificent buildings completed and an other under course of construction known as the Central Building. We have 150 orphan children there who are fed, educated, clothed and taught the useful avocations of life. It also has a printing press operated by these children and a good paper issued weekly from their own hands called "Charity and Children," at one dollar per year. Any who will contribute one dollar to this institution will get the paper free for one year. Respectfully submitted. JOHN ROBERTSON, G. W. ELLER, Committee.

The above report was adopted.

A collection of \$4 18 was taken up to send Elder J. R. Brown to Baltimore. M. D., for surgical treatment.

Chair announced preaching in the grove. Elders W. H. Glenn and E. Blevins. preached to a large and attentive audience at 11 a. m.

The association still continued business.

The report on Education was read. Remarks by E. L. Wagoner, W. C. Fields. The report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The committee wishes to emphasize the importance of the acquisition of the best education by those who propose to enter the ministry. For the purpose of a preparatory school we heartily recommend to the people Whitehead Academy, Whitehead, Alleghany Co., N. C., under the principalship of Prof. E. Leff Wagoner. To those who seek a college education, we recommend Wake Forest and those who desire to pursue a theological course, we recommend the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville. We strongly urge our churches to support by sympathy and patronage our educational institutions. JOHN J. GARVEY.

The report on Colportage was read. Remarks by W. F. Barker, T. M. Duncan, J. H. Farthing, R. L. Shoaf, H. A. Eller, L. J. Sturgill. The report was adopted.

The Colportage is one of very great importance, especially in this mountain section. There are so many of our people destitute of religious literature—and some of the word of the Lord. We recommend that this Association put one or two active brethren in the field. W. F. BARKER, J. E. JOHNSTON, Committee.

On motion it was agreed to instruct the Executive Committee to secure two colporteurs in the bounds of this

association.

The committee to name an Executive Committee report H. A. Eller, L. J. Sturgili, A. N. Johnson, J. J. Garvey and A. E. Graybeal as an Executive Committee. The above report was received.

The query asked by Big Laurel church was read and answered as follows: Query. Is it right to receive members by application from other churches that could get letters of dismission? Answer. We think it best to get letters when practicable.—H. A. ELLER, Committee.

## CONSTITUTION OF THE ASHE ASSOCIATION.

ART. 1, This body shall be called "The Ashe Association."

2. The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the association will co operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches composing the Association, and three delegates from each, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the churches.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, in such a way as the association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The Moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees and perform such other duties as are usually required of presiding officers.

6. The clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the association, pay them out as the association may direct. and make report at each annual session.

8. The association shall hold annual meetings at such times and places as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual session there shall be appointed an executive Committee of five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State convention, making to the next session a report of the work done, and the general state of mission work.

10. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage Periodicals, and Temperance.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The association will not receive or retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session

---

 RULES OF ORDER.
 

---

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the association to order, every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall arise and address the Moderator and not proceed until he has been recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body, and not over fifteen minutes at a time.
5. No member shall leave the body during its session without permission of the Moderator.
6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator or any member is speaking.

 ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES.
 

---

1. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.
2. We believe that the Bible—the Old and New Testaments—is the word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.
3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
4. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their Scriptural order.
6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized are in fellowship with the Church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.
7. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.
8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General judgment.
9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

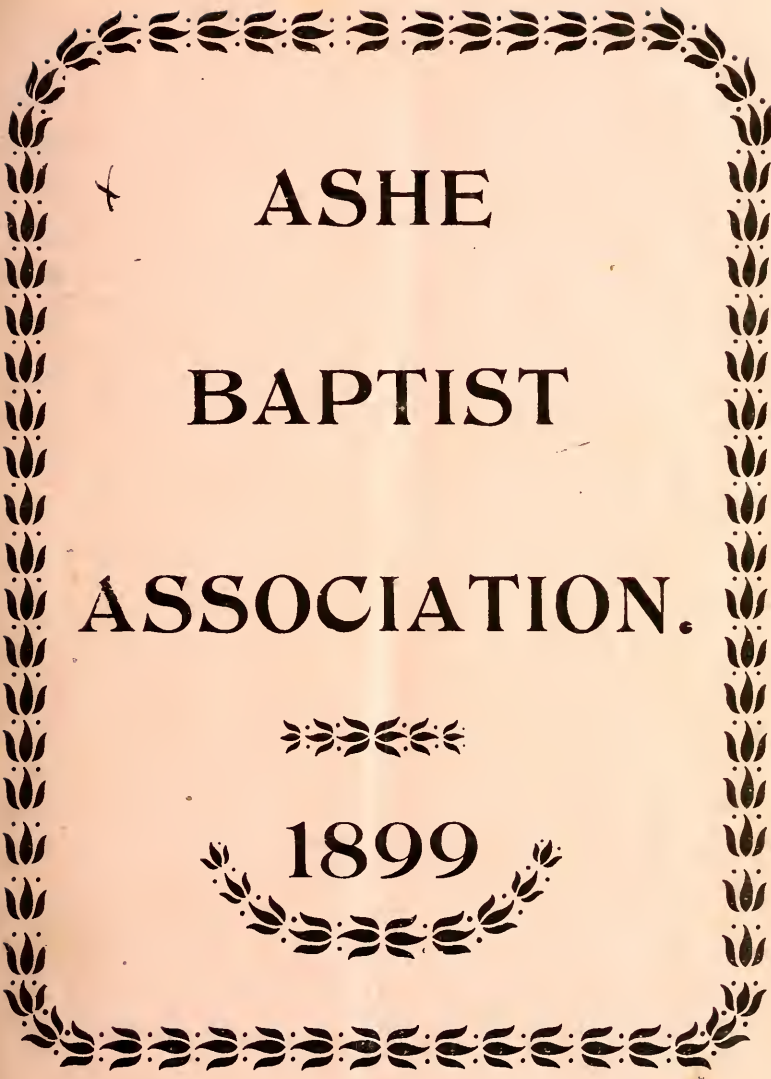

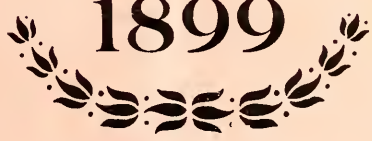

## PROCEEDINGS.

The Ashe Association met at New River Baptist Church, on Tuesday, Sept. 5th, 1899, in its 13th Annual Session. The Introductory was preached by Elder E. Blevins, the regular appointee not being present. Text: Mark the 9th chapter and part of the 50th verse:

“Have salt in yourselves and have peace one with another.”

The Association took a recess of 60 minutes and then reassembled for business. The body was called to order by former Mod. The list of the Churches was called and letters from all but Grayson's Chapel, Obids and Three Top were present and read by Eld. R. L. Shoaf and W. H. Gentry and a roll of Delegates was made as follows:

### **Election of Officers.**

Brethren F. B. Cheek and J. F. Fletcher were appointed as tellers to receive vote for officers, who report James Eller elected Moderator and G. L. Porter Sectary & Treasurer, who proceeded to their respective duties. Reception of new churches: the delegates from Windfall Baptist Church presented a letter asking membership with us. which after being read, was received and the hand of welcome was extended to them by the Moderator, The Articles of Faith, etc., were read by J. D. Roberts. The chair announced the following Committees: On Devotional exercises: W. H. Gentry, John Robertson with the delegates of this church; On Resolutions: R. L. Shoaf, J. D. Roberts and Wm. H. Eller; Time, Place and Preacher for Next Session: S. A. Campbell, T. J. Day, John Glenn. John Robertson and W.H.Gentry. On a request of Eld. J.F. Fletcher, the chair appointed Elders T. M. Duncan, E. Tucker and R. L. Shoaf Committee to confer with a like committee from New River and Alleghany and Grayson Associations to consider the propriety of hold-a Union Meeting for the benefit of the three Associations.

The following visiting brethren report themselves and were seated with the body: Elders J. F. Fletcher,

J. R. Brown and E. W. Reedy, from New River Association; Eld. F. B. Cheek and J. M. Wagoner, from Alleghany and Grayson Association; and Eld. Wm. H. Eller, from Piedmont Association.

Committee On Devotional Exercises report preaching tonight at church by Eld. G. J. Henderson and tomorrow at 11 A. M., by Eld. J. F. Fletcher and at 3 P. M., by Eld. J. R. Brown. On motion, adjourned till tomorrow at 9 A. M. Spent 30 minutes in devotional exercises. Begin business at 9:30 A. M. Prayer by Eld. C. Blevins, benediction by Eld. Wm. H. Eller.

#### 2nd Day—Wednesday.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment, spent 30 minutes in devotional exercises conducted by Eld. W. F. Barker. The proceedings of yesterday were read, the roll of delegates called and corrected. The chair announced the following committee: On Obituaries: I. M. Carter, E. Tucker and A. Clark. On motion, the regular order of business was suspended and Home Missions was taken up and discussed by Eld. Wm. H. Eller, J. D. Roberts, J. F. Fletcher and E. W. Reedy report:

We your committee on Home Missions submit the following: Our home mission territory consists of all destitute places in the southern part of the United States, Indian Territory, District of Columbia, Islands of Cuba and Porto Rico. We desire to say that much depends upon the effort that Baptists make in this Home Mission work in regard to the dimensions of Baptist territory. The Board is at work in every part of the field. Others who oppose us are at work there too and where we find but few hundreds to spend, they are furnished with thousands. Baptists who believe that their cause is God's cause should come to the help of the Lord against the mighty in this Home Mission work. Brethren we are called to wage against the opposers of our faith. If we do not hold up our faith in those destitute places no one else will hold it up for us. The Board has tried in the most impressive way to call our attention to these facts. Let us wake up brethren, and come to the help of the Lord. Submitted. E. TUCKER, G. W. ELLER, Committee.



Said report was adopted.

The chair announced preaching at the grove. Eld. J. F. Fletcher preached to a large and attentive audience at 11 A. M. The Association still continued business. The report on Foreign Missions was read and discussed by Eld. Wm H. Eller. J. D. Roberts offered a resolution as an amendment to said report as follows:

Resolved, That, each church in accordance with the request of the Foreign Mission Board of an advance of 25 per cent, in contributions be requested to contribute at least one cent per month per member to this cause for the next year. The resolution was adopted with said report.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission work of the Southern Baptist Convention embraces Italy, Brazil, Mexico, Africa, China and Japan. The three former are Papal fields and three latter are Pagan fields. Our Convention is doing mission work in all these lands and consecrated men and women from our midst are struggling to give the gospel to the perishing millions. In Papal fields we have 65 workers, and in Pagan fields 87 besides a number of natives in Japan. These all report the work as encouraging and growing demands for more workers to continue the work begun and advance the work further into heathendom. Your Committee would report a part of the report of the Foreign Mission Board to the Southern Baptist Convention at its last session: "We should praise God for the 845 baptisms on our foreign fields last year. This is by far the largest number of baptisms ever reported in connection with our work in one year. The blessings which have been poured out upon our workers have opened up new fields full of hope and call for more workers. The glorious success of this work the past year, with the large number of men and women begging to be sent to mission fields, the wide open doors and wonderful facilities for work with God's command to us constitute such a clear and ringing call as should awaken every pastor, every church; and every lover of the Lord to renewed zeal and activity. God is giving us victory in a way which should cheer and strengthen every heart. Brethren let us aid in this work." Let us not be short-sighted, narrow-minded

and mean-hearted, but rather let us devise liberal things for the good of humanity and the glory of God. For from him comes the command to preach the gospel in all the world. H. A. ELLER, Committee.

The report of the Executive Committee was read and discussed by Wm. H. Eller. The Association took a recess till 1:30 P. M. Benediction by Eld. R. L. Shoaf. The Association reassembled at 1:30 P. M. The report of Executive Committee was re read, discussion by H. A. Eller and J. F. Fletcher. The report as appears below, was adopted:

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

To the Ashe Association, Dear Brethren:—Your Committee present you with a report of the present state of mission work. We regret that the work is not in as encouraging a condition as we could wish, or as we had hoped, but circumstances over which your Committee had no control have conspired to thwart much which we had hoped and planned to accomplish. In the beginning of the year our entire field was divided into two fields, and the work was offered to Elders T. M. Duncan on the south-west of the county and Elihu Tucker on the north-east. The former accepted and began work about the 12th of Nov. The latter hesitated for more than a month and finally declined the work and the work on the field was given to Eld. W. F. Barker. And the brethren assigned to the different fields were requested to utilize the volunteer labor to the best advantage. This seemed to your Committee about all that could be done in arranging the work. A very modest amount was asked for the aid of each field from the State Board but nothing was granted. The names of three of our prominent brethren were recommended for the Colportage work, who agreed to work in the capacity, but so far as we are informed, nothing has been done. We give below the substance of the report of the missionaries appointed:

Elder T. M. Duncan reports as follows:—Begun work Nov. 12th. Had great success up to Jan. the 15th when he was stricken down with heart failure. Was unable to do any work for four months part of which time was confined to his room under medical treatment. During July and August has done a little work but suffers all the time. He reports success and much encouragement till the time of his affliction and could he have continued he believes that

much more could have been accomplished than in any previous year of his work, but did what he could under very depressing circumstances having been harder pressed to live and accomplish any thing for the Lord than in any year of his life, but counts it a privilege and a joy to sacrifice for the work. He reports: Traveled 200 miles. preached 80 sermons, professed conversions 58, organized S. S. 3, visited churches 9, religious visits 50. He reports: Received in the field \$38.90, pledges yet unpaid \$20.

Eld. W. F. Barker began work about the 15th of Dec., has held a regular appointment at Zion Hill. has visited every church in his field from one to three times during the year. Some churches are lively and the work is to some extent progressing while others are inactive. Sermons delivered 41, miles traveled 327, religious visits 8, professed conversions 34, baptisms 23, churches organized 1, S. S. 1, received from the field \$26.14, pledges by churches not paid \$13.36. He regrets that more has not been accomplished, and that he could not give more time, but was compelled to work part of his time for a living for his family, the field not sustaining him. He thinks the work on the field should be continued. Your Committee need not inform you of the destitution existing in our bounds, for all know that it is here to an alarming extent. We know that we should put forth, effort sufficient to remove it. We believe that we are able under God, to do much to bring our people to Christ. Will we do it? We cannot expect others to do the work assigned us. Your committee is desirous that the work shall be pushed, but we have exhausted our resources as to plans. We urge that an expression be given by the churches, that will enable this to go forward with renewed zeal and energy. Submitted. H. A. ELLER.

The report on State Missions was taken up and discussed by Eld. T. M. Duncan. An invitation was extended by the Moderator to visiting brethren. Elders C. M. Mikel and Thomas Warren report themselves as visitors from New River Association, G. E. Blevins from Stone Mountain Association. E. E. Phillips offers a resolution as an amendment to Report on State Missions, as follows:

Resolved, That, believing in the need of the work in the bounds of our Association, we appeal to the

State Board of Missions of the Baptist State Convention for aid in prosecuting the work and that the executive committee of this Association be instructed to bring the matter before the Board. The resolution was adopted.

Discussion of State Missions was further continued by Elders E. Tucker, W. F. Barker, J. D. Roberts, E. Blevins, G. J. Henderson, C. Blevins, John Glenn, the Moderator and others. The chair announced preaching in the grove. Eld. J. R. Brown preached to a large audience at 3 P. M. The business of the Association was continued. The Report on State Missions as appears below, was adopted:

Your Committee on State Missions submits the following:

State mission work means to preach the gospel in the destitution of N. C., establish churches, organize S. S. and aid weak churches, and promote Christianity among our people. The Lord has greatly blessed the work in the past. Our missionaries have preached the gospel from the sea shore to the mountain tops and from S. C. to Va., in more than three thousand places. Five hundred of our churches exist to day as a result of State Missions, and thousands of souls have been converted. Eternity alone will reveal the work done by the Board. Notwithstanding the vast amount of work done, we must not stop now, but strive with greater energy than ever before. Let us press forward; for there is greater responsibility resting upon us now than ever before. The Western Convention coming to us and being consolidated into one body, gives more work to do. So we should take courage and press forward under the orders of our Leader, the great Head of the church, until we take N. C. for Christ. We, as Baptists, claim that we have thus saith the Lord for what we preach and teach. That being so, let us be more earnest in prayer for the kingdom to come, and then use more liberally to giving the gospel to all of our people. The State mission work has been extended to this Association in the past and has built us up to our present strength. And it is our duty to show our appreciation by helping the Board to aid other weak fields and still prosecute the work on our own field. We have now on the field 130 missionaries who are looking to the

Board for their support And the board is looking to the churches for the money There is great responsibility resting on the pastors. They should keep the State mission work before their people and also all of the work of our Convention they should preach on giving; it is a part of the gospel and no one can declare the whole cause of God without preaching on the subject of giving. T. M. DUNCAN, E. BLEVINS, Committee.

Eller and John Rominger; Committee to Nominate an Executive Committee: John Robertson, M. F. Carter and S. A. Campbell.

## CONSTITUTION OF THE ASHE ASSOCIATION.

ART. 1. This body shall be called "The Ashe Association."

2 The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3 The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches composing the Association, and three delegates from each, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the churches.

4 At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer, in such a way as the Association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

5 The Moderator shall preside at the meeting, preserve order appoint committees and perform such other duties as are usually required of presiding officers.

6 The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

7 The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the Association, pay them out as the Association may direct, and make report at each annual session.

8 The Association shall hold annual meetings at such times and places as may be agreed upon.

9 At each annual session there shall be appointed an Executive Committee of five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association and co-operate with State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done, and the general state of mission work.

10 At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, and Temperance.

11 Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12 The Association will not receive or retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13 This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## RULES OF ORDER.

---

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the association to order, every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall arise and address the Moderator and not proceed until he has been recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body, and not over fifteen minutes at a time.
5. No member shall leave the body during its session without permission of the Moderator.
6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator or any member is speaking.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES.

---

1. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.
2. We believe that the Bible—the Old and New Testaments—is the word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.
3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
4. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their Scriptural order.
6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.
7. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.
8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.
9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

# PROCEEDINGS.

The Ashe Association met at Buffalo Church on Tuesday, Oct, the 9th, 1900 in its 14th, Annual session. The Introductory sermon was delivered by Eld. P. H. Haire. Text, John the 14th, Chapter and 27th, verse: "Peace I leave with you. my Peace I give unto you not as the world giveth, give I unto you Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." The Association took a recess of 30 minutes. Then reassembled for business. The body was called to order by the former Moderator. Prayer by Eld. E. Tucker. Macedona and Corinth presented letters asking membership with this association. The letters were received and read and the hand of welcome was extended to them by the Moderator. The Articles of Faith, Rules of Order, Etc, were read by H. A. Eller, after which brethren W. S. Farthing, William Elrod and J. F. Eller, reported themselves as corresponding brethren from the Three Forks Association, and accepted seats with the body. Brethren L. W. Farthing and Johnson Norris report themselves as visitors from Three Forks Association and were seated. The chair appoints the following committees: On Religious Exercises, delegates of this church with J. J. Garvey and John Robertson. On Finance, H. A. Eller and J. P. Goodman. On Obituaries, E. Tucker, I. M. Carter, W. H. Sheets. Resolutions, T. M. Duncan, H. A. Eller and W. S. Farthing. Time, Place and Preacher for next session, George Coldiron, E. W. Reedy and A. E. Graybeal. Committee to nominate an Executive Committee, S. A. Campbell and R. C. Spence. On motion Wednesday 2d day. was set apart as Century day, to discuss the progress, etc of the Baptists. Committee on Religious Exercises report preaching tomorrow at 11 a. m. by Elders J. F. Eller and E. W. Reedy; and at 2 p. m. by Elders E. Tucker and W. F. Barker. The chair appointed Elder E. W. Reedy to fill vacancy in standing committee on Ministerial Education. On motion adjourned until tomorrow at 9 a. m.—spend 30 minutes in devotional exercises. then take up programme of Century Day. Prayer by Elder John Norris, benediction by Elder T. M. Duncan.

#### SECOND DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Wednesday, October 10th.—The Association met pursuant to adjournment, and spent 30 minutes in devotional exercises conducted by Elder J. F. Eller and others. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The roll of delegates was called and corrections made. The letter from Mission Home church was handed in and read. Elder W. R. Bradshaw reported as a visitor from Brushy Mountain Association and was welcomed a seat; also G. C. Woodruff, from Stony Fork, was reported as a visitor and welcomed a seat. The program of Centu-

ry day was taken up and the first subject, viz: "Our Denomination a Century ago," was discussed by Elders W. R. Bradshaw and E. Blevins at 10:30 a. m. Second item, viz: "Denominational growth during the last Century," was taken up and discussed by Elder P. H. Haire, J. D. Roberts, Elders J. F. Fletcher, W. S. Farthing. The chair announced time for preaching. Elders J. F. Eller and E. W. Reedy preached to a large and attentive audience in the grove. The discussion of Denominational growth was continued by Elder E. Tucker, E. L. Tucker and Elder John Norris at 11 a. m. Third item "Progress of our Denominational Missions during the last Century," was taken up and discussed by J. D. Roberts Elders T. M. Duncan, E. Blevins and W. R. Bradshaw. At 12:30 p. m. the Association took a recess of 60 minutes. Benediction by R. L. Shoaf.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

The Association reassembled at 1:30 o'clock p. m. and the 4th item on the program was taken up and discussed as follows: "What should be the special aim of the Denomination for the Century to come." Discussion by J. D. Roberts. S. L. Perkins, from Baltimore, reported as a visitor and was seated. The Chair announced preaching in the Grove by Elders E. Tucker and W. F. Barker. The Committee to nominate an Executive Committee reported H. A. Eller, J. D. Roberts. A. N. Johnson, L. J. Surgil and E. L. Tucker. The report was adopted

The 5th and last item in program, viz: "The leadership and responsibility of Pastors in the work," was discussed by S. L. Perkins, J. F. Fletcher and W. R. Bradshaw. The Association joined in Prayer led by Eld. J. F. Fletcher. The report of the Executive Committee was read and discussed by J. D. Roberts, S. L. Perkins, E. Blevins T. M. Duncan, P. H. Haire and John Robertson. The report as appears below was adopted. Report:

Soon after the appointment of the Executive Committee at the last session of the Association a meeting was called and the situation thoroughly discussed. We deem it expedient that a missionary should by all means be placed in the field for this whole time. The fund at our command would not justify this and we appealed to the State Board of Missions for aid. This could not be secured until the meeting of the Board in December and after many delays and much correspondence we were enabled to place Rev. J. F. Fletcher in the field on the 1st of May last. The State Board contributes \$250 to his salary and stipulates that two Sundays in each month shall be given to the Jefferson Church. The Committee has pledged the Association for \$100 per annum to his support; and

ask that this action be endorsed. Bro. Fletcher has been zealous in the work, visiting the different sections as rapidly as possible. He reports for the 5 months he has labored with us: Traveled over 300 miles, preached 39 sermons, added 5 by letter, collected \$11.75 for State Missions, \$4.20 for Foreign Missions, organized 1 new Sunday School, visited 60 families religiously. On the 2nd. Sunday and Saturday before in Aug. last under a call made by the Executive Committee an Associational Sunday School Convention was organized and plans laid for prosecuting this work with vigor during another year. There is great destitution of Baptist preaching and work in many parts of the bounds of our Association. Many of our Churches are weak and in many sections there is needed help. Two Missionaries could be used to an advantage if we only had the means to support them. This work demands our best efforts and we would urge liberal contributions on the part of each Church for the coming year. Respectfully submitted, J. D. Roberts Chairman for Committee.

On motion adjourned till tomorrow at 9 a. m to spend 30 minutes in Devotional Exercises. Prayer by Eld. W. R. Bradshaw. Benediction by Eld. E. Blevins.

#### THURSDAY MORNING SESSION.

Thursday, Oct. 11th.—The Association met pursuant to adjournment, spent 30 minutes in Devotional Exercise conducted by Eld. R. L. Shoaf and others. The proceedings of yesterday were read and adopted. A motion to read the reports on State, Home and Foreign Missions in connection be read and that Eld. W. R. Bradshaw preach in the Church at 11 a. m. The Chair appointed Elders T. M. Duncan, I. M. Carter and E. Blevins to answer query from Mission Home Church. The report on State, Home and Foreign Missions was read and discussed by Elders E. Blevins, P. H. Hare and R. L. Shoaf. Elder W. R. Bradshaw preached a warm and instructive sermon on State, Home and Foreign Missions: the reports were adopted. State Missions report:

The history of State Missions is virtually the history of the rise and progress of North Carolina Baptists reaching from the year 1720 to the present time; it is a work so clearly taught in the New Testament Scriptures that it needs no argument. Since the Organization of the Boards of Missions, our State Missionaries have preached the gospel in near 500 destitute fields or points and have organized at least one-third of the whole number of Baptist Churches that we now have in North Carolina; every department of our

denominational life has been stimulated by the State Mission work. We have one hundred Missionaries in the field at present. The cause of our Master is being pressed by the faithful workers; and their compensation is comparatively very small. And Brethren we should feel honored of God that we are co-laborers with Him in this great and glorious work of bringing North Carolina to Christ. Ours is the duty of prayer, sympathy and liberality. The time is now on us when each must do something to support these faithful men of God at present and to press the great work more vigorously in the future. We, your Committee recommend that every Pastor preach at least one sermon on State Missions during the ensuing year to their respective Churches and urge them to contribute more liberally to this object. Let all come up to the help of the Lord against the mighty. Respectfully submitted.

#### Report on Home Missions:

We, your Committee on Home Missions submit the following: The territory of the Home Missions Board holds a varied and vast population besides our Indian population 65,000. Texas alone has 200,000 Mexicans, the State 5000 Chinese, 40,000 Italians, 500,000 Germans and 7,000,000 Negroes. In addition to this mixed multitude we have 1,000,000 Cubans on our hands. With such conditions confronting it the Home Board cannot stop. It too must go forward. The number of Missionaries employed this year was 652 against 467 last year. Baptism this year 6,552 against 4,739 last year. Total additions to Churches this year 12,983 against 9,509 last year. There are many reasons why we should not forget the Home Board in our forward movement along all other lines. Brethren let us come to help of the Lord against the mighty. Submitted.

#### Report on Foreign Missions:

There has never been a time in the foreign Mission work of the Southern Baptist Convention that called for more strenuous efforts than the present. With the demands of the other fields occupied by our Missionaries equal to if not greater than ever before. The situation in China appeals to all christians in all civilized countries for extraordinary work in evangelizing this benighted country. God in His providence has opened the way for this work, and it is the duty of His people to accept the responsibility and press on with renewed energy in fulfilling this great command to teach all Nations in the way of Eternal life. The Foreign Mission Board now has at work ninety-one Missionaries and fifty-seven native helpers on the different fields with three recently appointed who will soon leave for this country for their work.

The receipts of the Board for the current year from May the 1st to Sept the 15th have been \$21,844.51. Under the instructions of the Convention at its session last May the Board has "gone forward" and is enlarging the work. Eight new missionaries have been appointed since the Convention; and there is a debt of \$14,139.08 upon the Board. All these facts demand earnest and immediate efforts on the part of our Churches, and we would urge prompt action in our contributions; and with them let us send to a throne of divine grace our prayers for these faithful servants of the Cross and thanks to the giver of every good and perfect gift for His protecting care over our own missionaries in time of sore trial and distress. We would specially commend to our people The Biblical Recorder, Charity and Children, The Skyland Baptist and also The Blue Ridge Baptist. Respectfully submitted.

## CONSTITUTION.

Art. 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association,

Art. 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will cooperate with the Baptist State convention of North Carolina.

Art. 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches composing the Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring letters certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership and work of the churches

Art. 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer, in such a way as the association may direct;—the last two offices may be held by the same brother.

Art. 5. The Moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are usually required of presiding officers.

Art. 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body and superintend printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

Art. 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the Association, pay them out as the Association may direct, and make report at each annual session.

Art. 8. The Associon shall hold annual meetings at such times and places as may be agreed upon.

Art. 9. At each annual session there shall be appointed an Executive committee of five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and cooperate with the State Mission board of the Baptist State convention, making to the next session a report of the work.

Art. 10. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make report at the subsequent session, on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, and Temperance.

Art. 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Art. 12. The Association will not receive or retain in its permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes or sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

Art. 13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## RULES OF ORDER.

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the Association to order, every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak, he shall arise and address the Moderator and not proceed until he has been recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by the permission of the body. And not over fifteen at a time.
5. No member shall leave the body during its session without permission of the Moderator.
6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator or any member is speaking.

## ABSTRACT of PRINCIPLES.

---

1. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God Head, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2. We believe that the Bible the Old and New Testament is the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the incapency of man and sovereignty of God.

4. We believe that Salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their Scriptural order.

6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that those who are thus baptized are in fellowship with the Church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.

7. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

The following order of business was adopted for this session: Meet at 9 a. m.; spend half an hour in devotional exercises; begin business at half-past 9; adjourn 12 m.; resume business at 1 p. m., and adjourn at will.

Prayer by Elder N. Campbell.

Benediction by Elder J. Norris.

The association adjourned 'till 9 o'clock a. m. to-morrow morning.

#### SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

The association met pursuant to adjournment and spent half an hour in devotional exercises, conducted by Elder S. Blevins.

At 9:30 p. m. the association was called to order by the moderator.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The report of the Executive Committee was called for and read, and discussed by brethren Fletcher, Blevins, White, Roberston, Ray, Glenn, Farthing, Shoaf, Norris, Blevins, Lovelace, Tucker and Stanley, and adopted as follows:

#### Report of Executive Committee.

The work of the committee the past year has been largely on the line laid out heretofore. Eld. J. F. Fletcher with the assistance of the state mission board, has been continued as our missionary, and has done good work and faithful service, especial in the southern part of the county, where the destitution as to religious instruction is greatest.

We inclose herewith Bro. Fletcher's report of the work done,

but this by no means conveys an adequate idea of the influence being exerted by his labors in the upbuilding of the master's cause,

We have realized the destitution of the section to which Bro. Fletcher calls our attention, and only wish it were in our power to relieve it.

Recognizing the importance of education in the spread of the gospel, we have made some efforts to secure a denominational school for the association, but we did not succeed, we would urge upon the association the crying necessity for immediate action on this question, and suggest that an educational committee be formed with ample powers for the purpose of organizing and operating an associational school within our bounds. In this connection we have cooperated with the Woman's Aid Society of the State, through its secretary Miss. Fannie E. Heck, in placing volunteer teachers for two months during the summer, at several points. We have in this manner used eight teachers, and could have secured more had there been request for them. These teachers did excellent work especially in the way of Sunday school, and organizing for mission work, and we would urge that more churches use them another year. The needs of the coming year are greater than ever, and if the work is to be prosecuted on the line laid out, it will be necessary for the churches to increase their contributions to this cause. To this end we would suggest the adoption of a systematic plan of contributing and remitting to our missionary.

With an earnest prayer to God for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in all our deliberations, and a renewed hope for great things in the master's cause during the coming year, we close our report.

Report of J. F. Fletcher as missionary, for 11 months ending Oct. 1, 1901; Sermons preached 104, families visited 112, protracted meetings held 5, conversions witnessed 27, baptised 10, churches supplied 4, new Sunday schools organized 2, collected for state mission \$9.17, associational mission \$15.95, foreign mission \$2.78, home mission \$1.60, S. S. and colportage \$1.34, other objects \$60.00. Obids church is again on its feet with a fair prospect of success.

Your missionary would call the especial attention of the Executive committee to the destitution in the southern side of the county, where the territory lying between Gap Creek and Laurelsprings, comprising, at least 125 square miles with but 3 little weak Baptist churches, to wit Macedonia, Obids, Zion Hill, neither one of which is able to live without help from the state mission board.

Bro Lescoe, from Threefork, Association was recognized and took a seat in the association. Preaching at the grove by Eld. W. W. White, at 11 a. m.

On motion the moderator with the aid of the clerk was instructed to appoint a committee on education to consider the propriety and advisability of establishing a denominational school in our bounds and take such ac-

tion as they may deem best.

Brethren M. M. Blevins, and E. Blevins, were appointed a committee on obituaries

The reports on State, Home, and Foreign Missions were read and their discussion postponed 'till tomorrow morning at 10. o'clock

The report on temperance was read and pending its adoption the association took a recess 'till 1, o'clock.

#### AFTERNOON.

The association resumed business at 1' o'clock.

The report on Temperance was discussed by Elds. J. Norris and L. W. Farthing. It was adopted.

### Temperance.

As intemperance is one of the greatest evils of our time, we would advise that all adhere strictly to the admonition of Paul to be temperate in all things, and to abstain from strong drink, and that the churches and pastors carry out the 12th article of our constitution.—E. Tucker. E. Blevins.

The following resolutions of sympathy to Eld. T. M. Duncan, was adopted.

Whereas we have learned with sorrow of the untimely death of the son of our beloved brother Rev. T. M. Duncan therefore, be it resolved, that we tender our dear Bro. and his family our deepest sympathy in their sore trial, and pray our Heavenly Father to comfort and support him in this great affliction.—J. F. Fletcher,

The following report on colportage was read and adopted, after being discussed by Shoaf, Tucker, and Fletcher.

### Report on Colportage.

Dear brethren, we urge that the executive committee of this association employ one good brother to carry on this work, we believe the colportage work to be a grand thing in the bounds of this association. At present we have none. Let us have one in the field next year.—E. L. Tucker, J. J. Bennett.

Preaching at the grove at 2, o'clock by Eld. J. Norris.

On motion the 9th article of the constitution was changed, so as to have the executive committee composed of three brethren in place of five.

The report on ministerial education was read and discussed by Fletcher, White, and Stanley, and adopted as follows:

## Ministerial Education.

We realize the necessity and importance of a better educated ministry. While we have the noble men of God, who have made our country what it is religiously, yet we believe that their success would have been greater, if they had been better equipped. Therefore, we urge upon our churches the necessity of requiring their young ministers to secure the best education possible.

We recommend Wake Forest College and the Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., for advanced students, and for those seeking an academic Education we recommend Solitude Academy to all our people, under the tutorship of Prof. L. M. Farthing, as worthy the patronage of all.—J. F. Fletcher.

Prof. L. M. Farthing, reported as a correspondent from the Threefork association and took a seat with the association.

The committee on religious exercises reported preaching for to-morrow at 11, o'clock by Eld. J. F. Fletcher, and Eld L. W. Farthing.

The report on Periodicals, was read and spoken to by Tucker, and Stantley, and adopted.

### Periodicals.

We, your committee on Periodicals wish to emphasize the importance of our people reading baptist literature, so that they may become better acquainted with the work of our denomination. We recommend that our ministers take the lead in this, and give their influence to baptist literature among our people. We recommend the Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children, and we urge all our people to take and read the Foreign Mission Journal, published at Richmond, Va., price 35c, per single copy, or 25c, in clubs of 10. We also recommend the Home Field, devoted to the work of the Home Mission Board.—G. L. Porter, J. A. Wagoner.

The report of committee on time and place of next meeting was submitted and adopted. viz: Time Tuesday before the 1st Sunday in Oct. 1902. Place, Bristol church, two miles north of Jefferson. Eld. E. Tucker, principal, Eld. J. F. Stanley, alternate.

### Report of State Missions.

The State Mission Board in the prosecution of its work, has to meet three problems, in the different sections of the state. Each

requiring a separate line of treatment. The eastern part of the state with false teaching of our doctrines demands a correct presentation of the truth as we believe it. The Middle section with its factory interest needs to be organized and held together with our own western country, with its baptistic principles requires that our people should be educated, educated to know their worth and influence, educated as to what are their duties and privaleges. These problems, the board is trying to meet. It has over one hundred missionaries in the eastern part of the state alone, and still the destitution is not met. By direction of the state convention the board has increased its work 25 per cent and there should be a corresponding increase on the part of the churches. We urge the hearty co-operation with the State Board in its work and liberal contributions to its support.

### Report on Home Missions.

Dear Brethren, the command of our Lord is imperative, to go and diciple all nations, and while there are different and important fields, there is no work of more importance than that done by our Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, Ga. About 20 new Missionaries were sent out last year, and the work has greatly prospered—1009 baptisms were reported last year. The disturbance in China has subsided, and the workers have returned to their fields with several new ones to aid in the work, and it is believed that the new China will be more open to the gospel than the old. The question is: Will we embrace the wonderful opportunity which is presented to us? Let us aid this work. We urge our churches to contribute to this cause and pray for the work and workers, and we urge our people to read Mission literature which can be obtained by reading the Foreign Mission Journal, published at Richmond, Va., price 25c per year.—H. Brethren, we can do much if we only try, and keep the orphans and bring a blessing upon ourselves. The Lord has commanded this: let us receive the blessing,—J. Roberston, R. L. Shoaf.

to work on this line.

### Obituaries.

B. A. Fletcher was born July 7, 1828: died June 24, 1901; age 72 yrs 11 mos, 17 days. She was a consistent member of the first Missionary church organized in Ashe county. She was left a widow early in life and remained such to death, notwithstanding the hardships and privations incident to widowhood, she maintained an unsoiled character and died the death of a true christian.—H. Mahala Tucker, born June 25th. 1821, 80 yrs, 3 mos, 22 days old. A member of Apple Grove church nearly 50 yrs. and was one of the four who first constituted White Top church, nearly 60 yrs ago. Mother of 11 children, 3 daughters and 8 sons; 2 daughter and 2 sons having preceded her to the spirit world. She was wife of David Tucker, Sen, and mother of Rev E. Tucker. A kind companion and a good mother is gone. "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord; they rest from their labors and their works do follow them."

Rev. Nathan Phillips, born Mar. 26. 1825; died Oct, 27, 1900: age 75 yrs, 7 mos, 1 d. Professed faith at 22 yrs. He lived in the Baptist church 53 yrs. A good man is gone. He was ever ready to do what could for the cause of Christ. He leaves a widow and 5 children, who have the sympathy of this association.

James Ashley died May 5, 1901, 87 yrs old: a member of the church 50 yrs. He was brutally murdered by an insane man. We trust he is at rest. He leaves 4 children.

# Constitution.

1 This body shall be called "The Ashe Association."

2 The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina

3 The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches composing the association, and three delegates from each, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the churches.

4 At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer, in such a way as the association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

5 The Moderator shall preside at the meeting, preserve order, appoint committees and perform such other duties as are usually required of presiding officers.

6 The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

7 The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the association, pay them out as the association may direct, and make report at each annual session.

8 The association shall hold annual meetings at such times and places as may be agreed upon.

9 At each annual session there shall be appointed an Executive Committee of 3 brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association and co-operate with State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done, and the general state of mission work.

10 At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, and Temperance.

11 Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12 The association will not receive or retain in permanent fellowship any church that retain in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13 This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## Rules of Order.

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the association to order, every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall arise and address the Moderator and not proceed until he has been recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by the permission of the body, and not over fifteen minutes at a time.
5. No member shall leave the body during its session without permission of the Moderator.
6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator or any member is speaking.

## Abstract of Principles.

We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God head the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2. We believe that the Bible—the Old and New Testaments—is the word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

4. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper were ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their Scriptural order.

6. We believe that baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.

7. We believe in final perseverance of the the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

Agreed to adjourn till 8:30 to-morrow morning, spend 30 minutes in devotional exercises and begin business Promptly at 9 o'cl'k recess at 12 m., begin business at 1 p. m. and adjourn at will.

#### SECOND DAY.

Wednesday Morning, October 1, 1902.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment and spent 30 minutes in devotional exercises conducted by Elder S. Blevins and came to order for business at 9 a. m.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved and the roll of delegates was called and corrected.

On motion the clerk was instructed to open a column in the minutes to report contributions to the Baptist Female University. The Committee on State Missions submitted a report and was discussed in connection with the report of the Executive Committee, by Elders Fletcher, Wilson Blevins, Brown, and Duncan, and by Bros. Doughton and Roberts. The reports were adopted.

#### Report of Executive Committee.

To the Ashe Baptist Association:

The Constitution of the Association makes it the



duty of your Executive Committee to look after the destitution within the bounds of the Association and co-operate with the Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention.

This we have tried to do, but the destitution is so great that it is impossible to cover the ground with the means at our command.

Elder J. F. Fletcher has been continued in the same field since our last session and has accomplished much good, especially in the Southern section of the county.

In addition to his regular appointments, viz: Jefferson, Bethlehem, Macedonia and Obids he has made two or three preaching tours, preaching to several churches each time, principally on the subjects of Missions, the great theme of all Evangelical Churches and especially so of our own denomination.

We enclose herewith Bro. Fletcher's report and ask its incorporation in the minutes of this session. We note the report of last session of this body in regard to Colportage, and would have been glad to had a Colporter in the field, but were not able to do so for want of funds.

To do effectual work, or even work of any kind in this line would require at least \$50.00; this we did not have at our command and no authority from the Association for securing it.

Some work was done also in the line of volunteer Mission teaching the past summer, but not so much as formerly, owing to many public schools being taught during the summer.

Miss Heck, the Secretary in charge of this work in the State offered us for the year thirteen teachers, but only four could be used, and these did good work.

The necessity of earnest work in all departments of the work within our bounds was never greater, and we urge enlarged contributions for its prosecution.

### THIRD DAY, THURSDAY, OCT. 2, 1902.

The report on Ministerial Education having been read on yesterday was spoken to by Duncan, Davis, Goodman Ray, the Moderator, Roberts, Lovelace, and Taylor. The report was adopted as follows:

#### Report on Ministerial Education.

The present condition of Christianity in this mountain country is due to an uneducated Ministry in a large measure, and we can boast of a success gained by our Father in the past. They deserve much honor for the great work they accomplished under great disadvantages. The great effort that is being made to educate the people as a whole, makes it very essential for our young ministers to be educated, and as it seems to be the will of God to call into his Vineyard to preach the Gospel young men without means, we urge our people to lend a helping hand to such needy young men to procure an English Education at least.

The report on temperance was read by Elder T. M. Duncan and spoken to by the same, Lovelace, Sturgill, and Shoaf. The report was adopted as follows:

#### Intemperance

The greatest sin that the Devil has ever introduced into the world to destroy both soul and body, and yet to our sorrow, we find professed Christians who claim to be the light of the world aiding and abetting in carrying on the work of Intemperance, clogging the wheels of Zion and helping to carry on Satan's Kingdom.

Again to the XII Article of our Constitution. Shall we as an Association carry it out? Or shall we strike it out? Your committee advise that the entire XII Article be carried out.

#### Colportage.

Your Committee on Colportage are unable to give any report notwithstanding Colportage is one of the most important branches of our work, yet it is neglected and has been for some time. Nothing has been done, hence nothing to report; but we would insist upon the Executive Committee and brethren to take some steps to secure one or more active, energetic men to travel as Colporter in the bounds of the Ashe Association, during the ensuing year at least.

Tucker; Periodicals, E. C. Taylor, W. F. Barker.

The Committee on Obituaries offered a report which was given a place in the minutes. The following brethren were appointed delegates to the Baptist State Convention, viz: J. D. Roberts, Elder J. F. Fletcher and Elder J. M. Feaves.

The following brethren were appointed Correspondents to the different sister Associations: Three Forks, T. M. Cuncan, R. L. Shoaf; Alleghany and Grayson, E. Blevins, J. N. Calloway and E. Tucker; New River, W. F. Barker, J. M. Neaves and E. C. Taylor.

On motion the Clerk was instructed to expend the money for minutes in his hands, in printing and distributing the minutes to the churches, deducting \$5 for services,

The Committee on Resolutions submitted the following which was adopted.

I Reading the great need of Colportage work in our bounds, we urge again that the Association use some to put at least one active man in the field.

II That we advise our churches to be very cautious in receiving members by application, and to adhere strictly to the XII Art. of our Constitution.

III That we as a body tender our thanks to the Brethren, Sisters and friends of this community for their kind hospitality during the sitting of this body.

The minutes of the day were read and received. On motion the Association adjourned to time and place before named. Prayer by Elder Fletcher.

The Association sang a hymn and delegation gave each other the parting hand.

So another Association passed and another year of opportunity is gone beyond our reach. May we utilize the present and whatever of the future may be ours for the upbuilding of the Redeemer's Kingdom in the world.

# CONSTITUTION.

1 This body shall be called the "Ashe Association."

2 The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3 The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches composing the Association, and three Delegates from each, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the churches.

4 At each Annual Session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer, in such a way as the association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

5 The Moderator shall preside at the meeting, preserve order, appoint committees and perform such other duties as are usually required of presiding officers.

6 The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

7 The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the association, pay them out as the association may direct, and make report at each annual session.

8 The association shall hold annual meetings at such times and places as may be agreed upon.

9 At each annual session there shall be appointed an Executive Committee of three brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association and co-operate with State Mission board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done, and the general state of Mission work.

10 At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals and Temperance.

11 Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12 The association will not receive or retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13 This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual session.

## Rules of Order.

- 1 Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.
  - 2 When the Moderator calls the association to order, every member shall at once take his seat.
  - 3 When a member wishes to speak he shall arise and address the Moderator and not proceed until he has been recognized.
  - 4 No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body, and not over 15 minutes at a time.
  - 5 No member shall leave the body during its session without permission of the Moderator.

## CONSTITUTION OF THE ASHE ASSOCIATION,

ARTICLE 1 This body shall be called "THE ASHE ASSOCIATION"  
2 The object of this Association shall be organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the Gospel in our bounds and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina,

3 The members of this body shall be all the Ordained Ministers of the churches composing this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership and work of the churches.

4 At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, in such way as the Association may direct; the last two offices may be held by the same brother.

5 The Moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are usually required of presiding officers.

6 The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

7 The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the Association, pay them out as the Association may direct and make a report at each annual session.

8 The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9 At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive Committee of three brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done, and of the general state of Mission work.

10 At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports during the session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, and Time, Place and Preacher for next session.

11 Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12 The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13 This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

### RULES OF ORDER.

- 1 Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2 When the Moderator calls the Association to order every member shall at once take his seat.
- 3 When a member wishes to speak he shall arise and address the Moderator and not proceed until he has been recognized.

## REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

The Orphanage commenced operations the first of Nov. 1884. The plant now consists of nineteen brick buildings three good wooden buildings besides the barns and stables. The farm consists of 350 acres of land; we have on it six head of mules and horses, about 25 head of cattle and a few hogs. The plant in all is easily worth \$50,000. The first orphan was admitted the first day of Nov. 1884; since that time to the closing of the fiscal year of 1903 there has been admitted into the Orphanage over 800 orphans. There were present at the closing of the last fiscal year 260 orphans which shows that over 300 have gone out from the institution; many of whom have taken honorable positions in the world. We have there boys, one of whom is a bad cripple, and one little girl from the Ashe Association. Therefore it is our duty as a christian organization to support this institution with our means and pray God's blessings upon the same. Respectfully submitted M. M. Blevins. Com

## CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This body shall be called The Ashe Association.

The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the Gospel in our bounds and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

2. The members of this body shall be all the Ordained Ministers of the churches composing this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, in such way as the Association may direct; the last two offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The Moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are usually required of presiding officers.

6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the Association, pay them out as the Association may direct and make a report at each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive Committee of three brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association and co-operate with the State Mission board of the Baptist State Convention making to the next session a report of the work done and of the general state of Mission work.

10. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports during the session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance and Time, Place and Preacher for next session.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

RULES OF ORDER.

- 1 Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2 When the Moderator calls the Association to order every member shall at once take his seat.
- 3 When a member wishes to speak he shall arise and address the Moderator and not proceed until he has been recognized.
- 4 No member shall speak more than twice on any subject, except by permission of the body.
- 5 No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.
- 6 It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up leave the house, or hold private conversation while the Moderator or any member is speaking.
- 7 Order of business:
  - a Introductory sermon.
  - b Enrollment of delegates.
  - c Election of officers.
  - d Reception of new churches.
  - e Reading Constitution, Rules of Order and Abstract of Principles.
  - f Appointment of committees.
  - g Report of Executive Committee.
  - h Report of Treasurer.
  - i Report of committees.
  - j Miscellaneous.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES.

- 1 We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three Persons in the God-head—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.
- 2 We believe that the Bible, the Old and New Testaments—is the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.
- 3 We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
- 4 We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
- 5 We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
- 6 We believe that baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.
- 7 We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to glory.
- 8 We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.
- 9 We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

Dear Brethren—Your committee can sav with pleasure that Rev. J. F. Fletcher has been retained by the State Convention in our field of work, and it has been thought best by us, to continue his efforts at the same points occupied last year. The work at Obids and Old Fields is in excellent condition. At Obids we have an organization of 28 members in good working condition and a good house of worship well under way which we hope to see completed in the near future. This work is now very hopeful, from the fact that its membership is composed of excellent material. At Old Fields the work is in excellent condition, sixty-two members. A good Sunday School is maintained. A good house of worship is practically finished at a cost of \$400 or \$500 and we now hope that these points will become strong and self-sustaining churches. The work at Jefferson, while it may seem to be going slowly, still we think that it is in good condition, and we are measurably satisfied with its present condition. Johnson and allowed him to officiate in her ordinances, who stands an excluded member from Beaver Dam church, in Three Forks Association, for heresy and in gross disorder—And whereas, it appears to the satisfaction of this body now in session, that the said Brushy Fork church, has called and recognized as pastor one James Stout, who is also an excluded member from Holly Springs church, of Watauga Association, for uniting with the said J. C. Johnson, and preaching and advocating the same heresy to the jeopardy of the peace and prosperity of the Baptist cause. Therefore, Resolved. That the Ashe county association, now in session, humbly pray and entreat the said Brushy Fork church to put from among them that heresy that can only blight her hopes of future prosperity, and remain in fellowship and union with her brethren who feel that they need their help in prosecuting the great work which God has called his people to do. And your committee would recommend that this body appoint a committee of expe-



rienced and influential brethren to confer with the said Brushy Fork church at once and labor with her in a spirit of love and help her to see her mistake. And your committee would further exhort the churches composing this association to rise up in their might and stand firm against this pernicious influence which is threatening the peace and prosperity of our homes and our churches. And further, your committee would commend the noble action of Clifton church; that when she was enabled to see her mistake like brave and true men, confessed her mistake and has set herself right before the world. ## CONSTITUTION,

Article 1 This body shall be called The Ashe Association.

The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the Gospel in our bounds and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

2 The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches composing this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4 At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, in such a way as the Association may direct; the last two offices may be held by the same brother.

5 The Moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are usually required of presiding officers.

6 The clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

7 The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the association, pay them out as the association may direct and make a report at each annual session.

8 The association shall hold an annual meeting at such time as place may be agreed upon.

9 At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive Committee of three brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association and co-operate with the State Mission board of the Baptist State Convention making to the next session a report of the work done and of the general state of Mission work.

10 At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports during the session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance and Time, Place and Preacher for next session.

11 Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12 The association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13 This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## RULES OF ORDER.

- 1 Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2 When the Moderator calls the Association to order every member shall at once take his seat.
- 3 When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed until he has been recognized.
- 4 No member shall speak more than twice on any subject, except by permission of the body.
- 5 No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.
- 6 It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up leave the house, or hold private conversation while the Moderator or any member is speaking.
- 7 Order of business:
  - a Introductory sermon
  - b Enrollment of delegates.
  - c Election of officers
  - d Reception of new churches.
  - e Reading Constitution, Rules of Order and Abstract of Principles
  - f Appointment of committees.
  - g Report of Executive Committee
  - h Report of Treasurer.
  - i Report of committees.
  - j Miscellaneous.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES.

- 1 We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.
- 2 We believe that the Bible, the Old and New Testament— is the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice
- 3 We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
- 4 We believe that salvation is by grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
- 5 We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ. to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
- 6 We believe that baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.
- 7 We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to glory.
- 8 We believe in the re-urrection of the dead and a general judgment.
- 9 We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Dear Brethren: Your committee can say that by the continued aid of the State Mission Board, Eder J. F. Fletcher has been continued on the field as missionary and has done much valuable service at five points, viz: Jefferson, Beaver Creek, Mission Home, Old Fields and Obids, besides some other points assisted at different times, besides making a tour of nearly the whole Association. He has assisted in the organization of one new church. We feel sure he has done faithful work and as much as we can expect any man to do for the same remuneration and under the existing conditions; and while we express our satisfaction at what has been done, we are far from being satisfied with the condition of our entire work. The points occupied the past year are still needy and clamoring for continued aid and certain unfortunate circumstances among some of our churches have demanded his services and still needs them. These points need and demand their whole time of one or more men; besides we have a territory lying on our east as large as one fourth of the whole county, practically untouched by us and largely unoccupied by any denomination and destitute of regular

gospel preaching. This territory is ours if we will possess it and will in time be a source of much strength to us if cultivated now. It has been our policy for years to advance upon and work this territory as fast as possible, so we are at a loss to know just what to recommend. But we advise that we continue to uphold the work already begun at the most needy places before named and push out to promising points on the eastern border and if the Association can see its way clear to put more force to work it will be well to do so. We recommend that steps be taken now to secure financial aid to continue this work and hope that delegates will respond with liberal pledges to this work. Brethren, pardon your committee for this one suggestion, to wit: If we expect to make any advancement or even hold our ground, we must, we MUST quicken our pace. Submitted,

#### REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Orphanage has had under its care since it began twenty yrs. ago some 800 children. There are 300 there now. The cost of maintaining a child is \$5 a month and this included the salaries of all the employes. In connection with the institution there is a farm of over 300 acres on which the boys find profitable employment. There is also a wood shop, a shoe shop and a printing office which provide valuable training and from which many of the boys have gone to fill honorable places in the State. The management of the orphanage is under Rev. M. L. Kesler, a man of fine common sense and ability. It is in excellent condition and its prospects are bright for the best year in its history. There are from the Ashe Association four children which are costing somebody \$20 a month. Are we allowing some other Association to support these children? We urge our people to make more liberal contributions to the Orphanage and thus come nearer the measure of our duty to it.

### CONSTITUTION.

ART. 1. This body shall be called The Ashe Association.

2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the Gospel in our bounds and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be, all the ordained ministers of the Churches composing this Association, and Three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual Session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator a Clerk and Treasurer in such a way as the Association may direct, the two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The Moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees and perform such duties as are usually required of presiding officers.

6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body and superintend printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the association, pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive Committee of three brethren, who shall look after the distributions in the bounds of this association and co-operate with the State Mission board of the Baptist State Convention making to the next session a report of the work done and of the general state Mission work.

10. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports during the session on the following subjects: State Missions, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, Temperance, Digest of church letters, Finance, Time, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLELS.

1. We believe in one only true and living God: and that there are three persons in the God head. the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost and these three are one.
2. We believe that the Bible the Old and New Testament, is the word of God, and the only rule of Faith and practice
3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
4. We believe that salvation is by grace, through Faith in our lord Jesus Christ.
5. We believe that baptism, and the Lord's Supper, are ordizances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
6. We believe that baptism is the immersion, of a believer, in water, by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lords Supper.
7. We believe in the final perserverance of the Saints in grace to glory.
8. We believe in the re-surrection of the dead and a general Judgment.
9. We believe that the existance of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eteual.

### RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed until he, has been recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.
5. No member shall leave the body during the Session, without permission of the Moderator.
6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking.

Fletcher decided to leave the work; which he did some time before the meeting of the convention So the work stopped before last convention year expired, and your committee was powerless to do anything till the action of the Mission Board was heard from which owing to some failure in the postal service was not till in February, and after hearing from their action it took till the first of April, to arrange and secure a man for the field. Elder R. L. Shoaf was secured and put to work beginning with the month of April and has been engaged ever since, who has put almost his whole time since then into the work, and we think has done much good service, but we sustain real loss from the disappointment and delay, which resulted from what we have before said, which no one could have regained in the rest of the year. He has tried to cover as nearly as possible the whole field, and has been to all but two churches, and has kept monthly appointments at four different points. He reports the work in a needy and discouraging condition. A number of our churches need aid and encouragement from the association, infact it occurs to your committee, that we have lost ground at a number of points and interest among all our churches. Many of our people have become negligent as to church going and Christian

effort, your committee is at a loss to know what to recommend for the ensuing year, we have been a beneficiary of the State Board so long, and have made so little, if any progress, that we seriously doubt the wisdom of longer asking aid from that source. We believe the association to be financially strong enough to carry on this work without, out side aid if you will, and it is the opinion of your committee, that we will never make real and substancial progress as a denomination until we rise in our full strength to do our duty, when we reach this point, then we may hope for success.

In order to accomplish any thing it is necessary for this association to raise at least two hundred and fifty dollars, and not only so, but it is necessary for us as members and individuals to take an active part in all our church and Mission work, the work needs our prayers and efforts as well as our means. Now prethren we have given you the situation as we see it, and it is with you, will we falter and turn back and keep a blessing from our selves and the rising generation, or will we measure up to our opportunities?

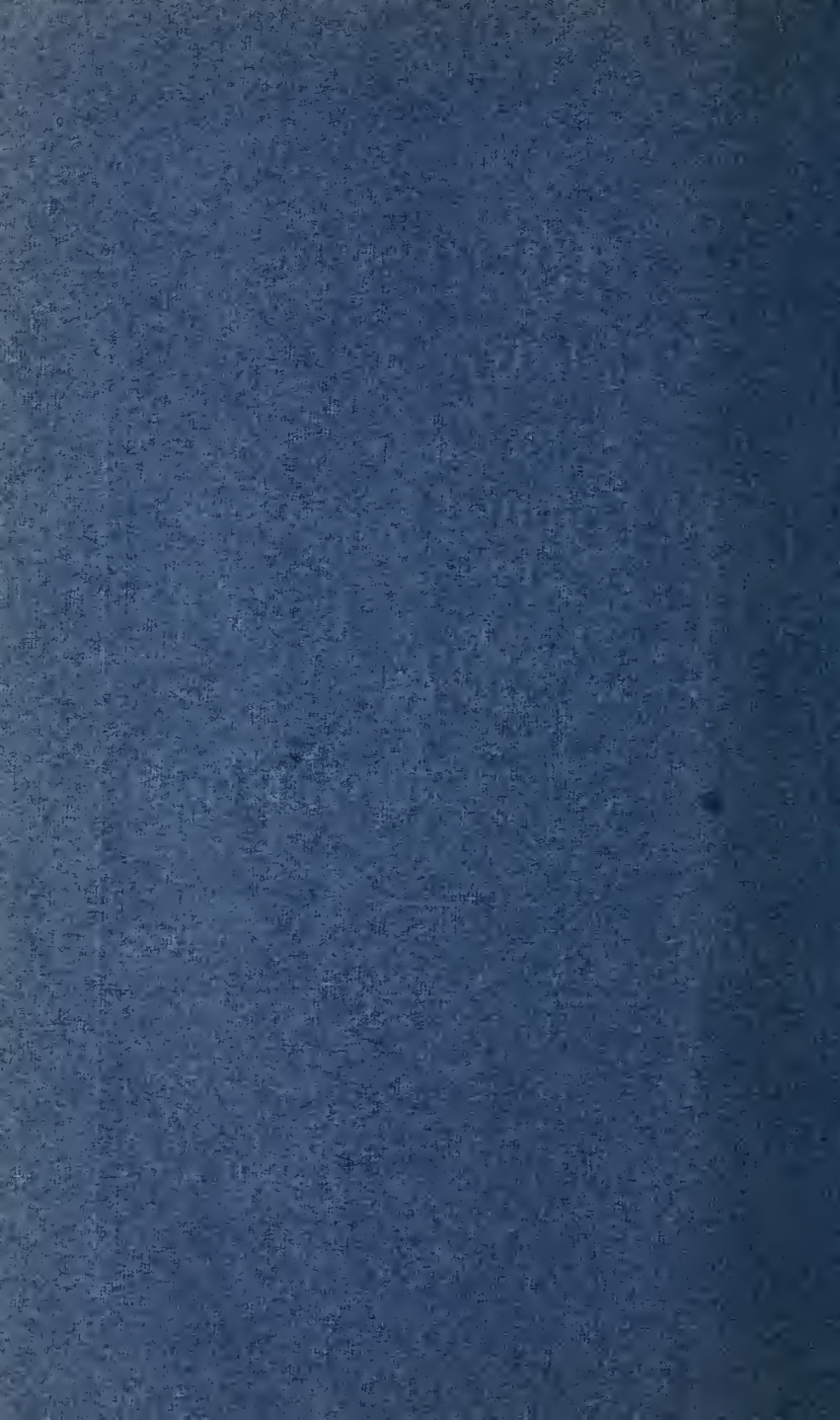

## THE ASHE ASSOCIATION

### CONSTITUTION

Art. 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be, all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and Three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator a Clerk and Treasurer in such a way as the Association may direct, the two last offices may be held by the same Brother.

5. The Moderator shall preside at the meeting, preserve order, appoint committees and perform such duties as are usually required of presiding officers.

6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the Association, pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive Committee of three brethren, who shall look after the destitutions in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention making making to the next session a report of the work done, and of the general State Mission work.

10. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports during the session on the following subjects: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Time, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

---

### *Abstract of Principals*

1. We believe in one only true and living God: and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost and these three are one.

2. We believe that the Bible the Old and New Testament, is the word of God, and the only rule of Faith and practice.

3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4. We believe that salvation is by grace, through Faith in our Lord J us Christ.

5. We believe that baptism, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6. We believe that baptism is the immersion, of a believer, in water, by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in grace to glory.

8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

---

### *Rules of Order*

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

21. To the Ashe Association:

Dear Brethren your Executive Committee has but little to report that is not already known to the Association. As it is known that the Association elected its own Missionary at its last session, and provided means in part for his support. Your committee reported this action to the State Board of Missions, and asked for a supple- ment to his salary, but the Board declined to aid this field in this way but offered to aid this field in helping to support a man of its choosing to be stationed at Jefferson, and taking the Pastoral care of that church and devoting the balance of his time to the entire field as Missionary, or taking Pastoral care of other churches and looking to the churches aided for part of his support, or to the As- sociation if strictly missionary work be done. Elder Elihu Tucker has been faithful to the work assigned him, in so far as his en- vironment and condition would permit, and so far as your com- mittee is informed. He has covered a large part, if not the entire field and has held meetings of interest with a number of our churches and some ingathering of membership and encouraged state exists at different places. He has organized one new church which promises to become strong and self-supporting, besides oth- er service rendered, and he has had no financial aid except what the churches and individuals have given. Your committee will not undertake to advise or recommend any different method to continue the work upon, but expresses the hope that the Associa- tion will continue this work with more vigor and force than here- tofore. Your committee would be glad to see a strong man sta- tioned by the Board and individual churches at Jefferson, and some acceptable man giving his whole time to the entire field, and we trust that the Association will make provisions for this latter work at this session.

Thirty-eight accessions to the churches, baptized and assisted in baptizing thirty-one, preached a great many sermons, visited a great many homes. Organized one new church at Nathan's Creek, N. C., by the name of Liberty Hill Baptist church. I find all the churches in fairly good condition with a very little exception. I find that four of our churches have for their Pastor a Brother who is not connected with any church, and ask whether it is consistent for our churches to have a Pastor of that kind. ### 32. REPORT HOME MISSIONS

There is no department of our work that claims our attention more than the work of our Home work. Seeing the great need of the work of this department being enlarged, the Southern Baptist Convention advised that we as a Baptist people raise five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for this object. The record for last year in independent and corporation work was in part, 15,526 members added by baptism, 13,008 added by letter, 237 churches constituted, 309 houses of worship built and repaired, 648 Sunday Schools organized. These figures do not include some other statistics and the untabulated influence of 112,604 gospel sermons and addresses, and the lives of 865 Godly missionaries. When we consider the number of Foreigners that are coming into our Home Mission bounds who must be saved or they will lower our standard of civilization. What answer will this Association make to these appeals. Your committee advises that we double our contributions to the Home Mission Board. That we inform ourselves on this work by taking our Home Field.

The work is ours the Lord and Master whose we are and whom we serve, commands us to preach the Gospel to every creature, to be witnesses for him unto the uttermost parts of the earth. What does that mean? Does it not mean that the christian people of today ought to give the Gospel to those who have it not, that they may learn the way of life and salvation? Is it not a solemn duty laid on us by our Savior? Does any dare to answer in the negative? This is not a matter of sentiment or of idle dreaming, but a matter of obedience. If we can we must and it is evident we can or the Lord would not have commanded.

Through the good management of those having charge of it, and the liberal contributions of our people it has become to be a noble institution one that we are thankful for and one that we are proud of. # CONSTITUTION

---

Article 1 This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2 The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the Gospel in our bounds and in all the world and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3 The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association and three delegates from each church who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving Statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4 At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer in such way as the Association may direct, the two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5 The Moderator shall preside at the meeting preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

6 The Clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body and superintend printing and distributing to the churches these proceedings.

7 The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent up to the Association, pay them out as the Association may direct and make a report at each annual session.

8 The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time, and place as may be agreed upon.

9 At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive Committee of three brethren who shall look after the destitutions in the bounds of this Association and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention making to the next session a report of the work done and of the general State Mission work.

10 At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports during the Session on the following subjects, State Mission, Home Mission, Foreign, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, Temperance, Digest church letters, Finance, time, place and preacher for next Association.

11 Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12 The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice or who makes; sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13 This constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds the members present at any annual session.

---

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPALS.

1 We believe in one only true and living God and that there are three persons in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost and these three are one.

2 We believe that the Bible, the Old and the New Testament is the word of God and the only rule of Faith and practice.

3 We believe in the impotency of man and the Sovereignty of God.

4 We believe that Salvation is by grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5 We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their Scriptural order.

6 We believe that baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7 We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in grace to glory.

8 We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9 We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

#### RULES OF ORDER.

1 Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2 When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.

3 When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed until he has been recognized.

4 No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5 No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6 It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking.

## CONSTITUTION.

Art. 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

Art. 2. The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds and in all the world, and in this work the association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this association and three delegates from each church who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6. The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distributing to the churches the proceedings of the body.

7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the association, pay them out as the association may direct and make a report to each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive committee of three brethren who shall look after the destitutions in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention making to the next session a report of the work done and of the general State Mission work.

10. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports during the session on the following subjects, to wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Time, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice or who makes sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## Abstract of Principles.

*there* 1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that ~~these~~ these are three persons in the God head, The Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost and that these three are one.

2. We believe that the Bible the Old and the New Testament is the word of God and the only rule of Faith and Practice.

3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4. We believe that salvation is by grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5. We believe that Baptism and the Lords Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.

7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

## Rules of Order.

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed till he has been recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

#### REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

47. That we are living in an age of surpassing advancement and of unusual intellectual and material activity no one will deny. Materialism is fast absorbing the best efforts of the human mind in our country today. Lawyers, doctors, teachers and mechanics are striving mightily to exhaust the resources of their various avocations, and at first thought it would seem that the ministry should not lose pace in point of intellectual power with the other avocations and professions of life. But right here we are confronted with an almost insurmountable obstacle. Our ministers are only half paid. This seems to be true in the nation as well as the State and county. If we would aid in the educational uplift of the ministry, then we must double the salaries of ministers and so stop driving away the strongest and fittest young men from the Baptists, as Dr. Clark F. Ahed, New York, says: "But some one says we can't afford to hire men to preach. True enough, indeed, it would be foolish to hire men to preach who are unfit to occupy the sacred desk. On the other hand, when you double the salary of a good man, one called of God to deliver the message of salvation to a lost world, then you have more than doubled his power and influence for good. To men who are not in reach of an academic collegiate training, we think St. Paul's admonition to Timothy, when he says "study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman needeth not be ashamed. Rightly dividing the word of truth is worthy of much consideration." Respectfully submitted.—J. C. Goodman, Comm.

## CONSTITUTION.

---

Art. I. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2. The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds and in all the world, and in this work the association will cooperate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this association and three delegates from each church who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6. The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distributing to the churches the proceedings of the body.

7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the association, pay them out as the association may direct and make a report to each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive committee of three brethren who shall look after the destitutions in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention making to the next session a report of the work done and of the general State Mission work.

10. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports during the session on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Periodicals, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Time, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES.

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God head, The Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost and that these three are one.
2. We believe that the Bible the Old and the New Testament is the word of God and the only rule of Faith and Practice.
3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
4. We believe that salvation is by grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.
7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.
8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.
9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

## RULES OF ORDER.

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed till he has been recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.
5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.
6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking.

1. The Ashe Association met in its twenty-fourth annual Session with Landmark Baptist Church at 11 A. M.

8. Called roll of churches, thereupon twenty-nine churches responded and handed in their letters which were read by the Clerk assisted by J. W. Duncan and enrolled the names of the messengers representing the various churches, whose names will appear on another page.
9. Windfall church also responded to the roll call of church through her members, Rev. Elihu Tucker, J. W. Tucker and James Wagoner, not having any letter as authorized list of messengers. Therefore on motion Windfall church was allowed representation in the Association, and the afore named Brethren were seated as her messengers.
10. On motion the former rules were suspended, and the Moderator called for new constituted churches. Thereupon Bald Mountain Baptist church responded and handed in her letter, which was read, and her messengers were interrogated upon the abstract of principles, whose answers were satisfactory to the Association.
11. On motion Bald Mountain church was received as a member of the Association, her messengers were extended the hand of welcome and fellowship by the Association through the Moderator and seated with the body.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

25. We regret the small amount of Mission work done during the Associational year just ending, when so much was needed to be done. Your Committee expended all the means furnished us for Mission work, at two points, viz: Brushy Fork and Long Branch. Elder P. H. Haire began work at Brushy Fork church in October last, and labored with this church for three months, and was forced to stop the same there in consequence of active opposition which locked the door of the church. The outlook at this place is hopeful, if our people can gain control of the house of worship, which is in litigation. We recommend that the Association give material aid to the Brethren at this place to help them to defend their rights in court. The Brethren at this place paid Elder Haire \$6.25 and the Executive committee supplemented it with \$5.75, making a total of \$12.00. Elder P. H. Haire began work at Long Branch church early in December 1909, and has preached there monthly to the present time, and held a meeting of fifteen days during the winter, in which forty persons professed a hope in Christ. Fifteen were added to the church. The present condition and outlook at this place is encouraging, the erecting of a house of worship is contemplated in the near future. This place paid Brother Haire \$15.00 for his labor, and the Executive committee paid him about the same, which is all that has come into our hands, making about \$21.00 collected and expended on the entire field. Your committee regrets exceedingly to report so little done when so much is needed to be done, we think however that the small means furnished us, was spent to as good a purpose as could have been under the existing circumstances. We recommend and urge this Association to provide means with which to do more during the next year. We ask that all our people take interest in and pray for the success of this work, and the rebuilding of all our churches, and we urge our ministers to aid in strengthening our weak, and struggling churches.

At the close of the reading of this report Floyd Best, a late inmate of the Orphanage, but who has a home with James Eller, was introduced to the Association, who gave a talk and was closely interrogated concerning the inmates and workings of the Orphanage, which was much appreciated by all who heard him.

Upon the adoption of this report it was recommended by the Association that the pastors of the various churches appoint a committee of three sisters of each church, to collect funds for the Orphanage. Thereupon Brother T. F. Ray, who is one of the best friends to the Orphan children, and the Orphanage made an earnest appeal to the Association and the congregation in general for aid for the Orphanage, and the Moderator also made an appeal to the Association for aid for Mrs. Ida Hurley, who was almost burned to death in the spring, and who is still in a critical

condition and needy circumstances. Upon these appeals a collection was taken for each object. Brethren T. F. Ray and Floyd Best being appointed to receive the same, which resulted in a collection for the Orphanage to \$16.11; subscription to Charity and Children, \$2.00; collection for Mrs. Ida Hurley, \$15.91.

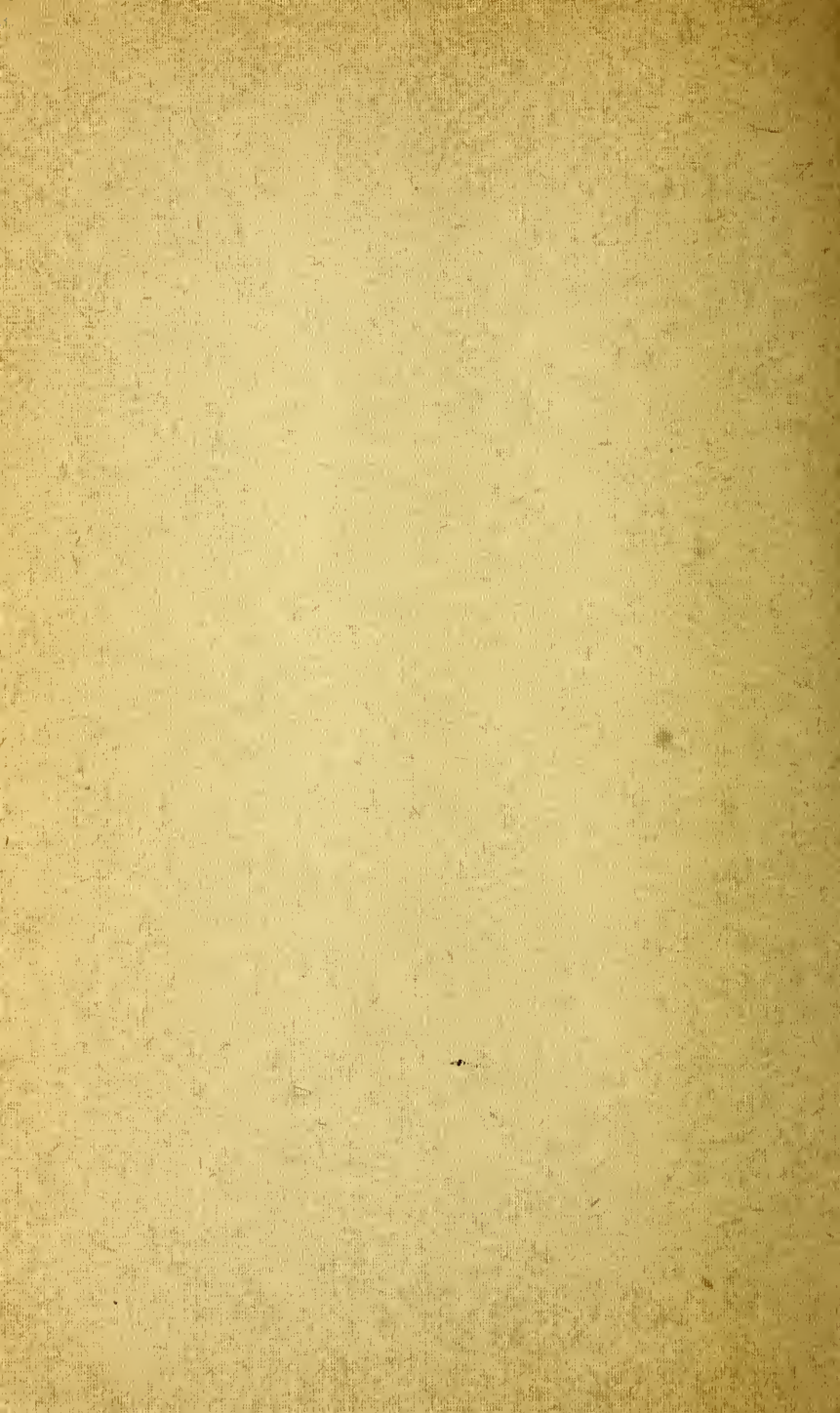

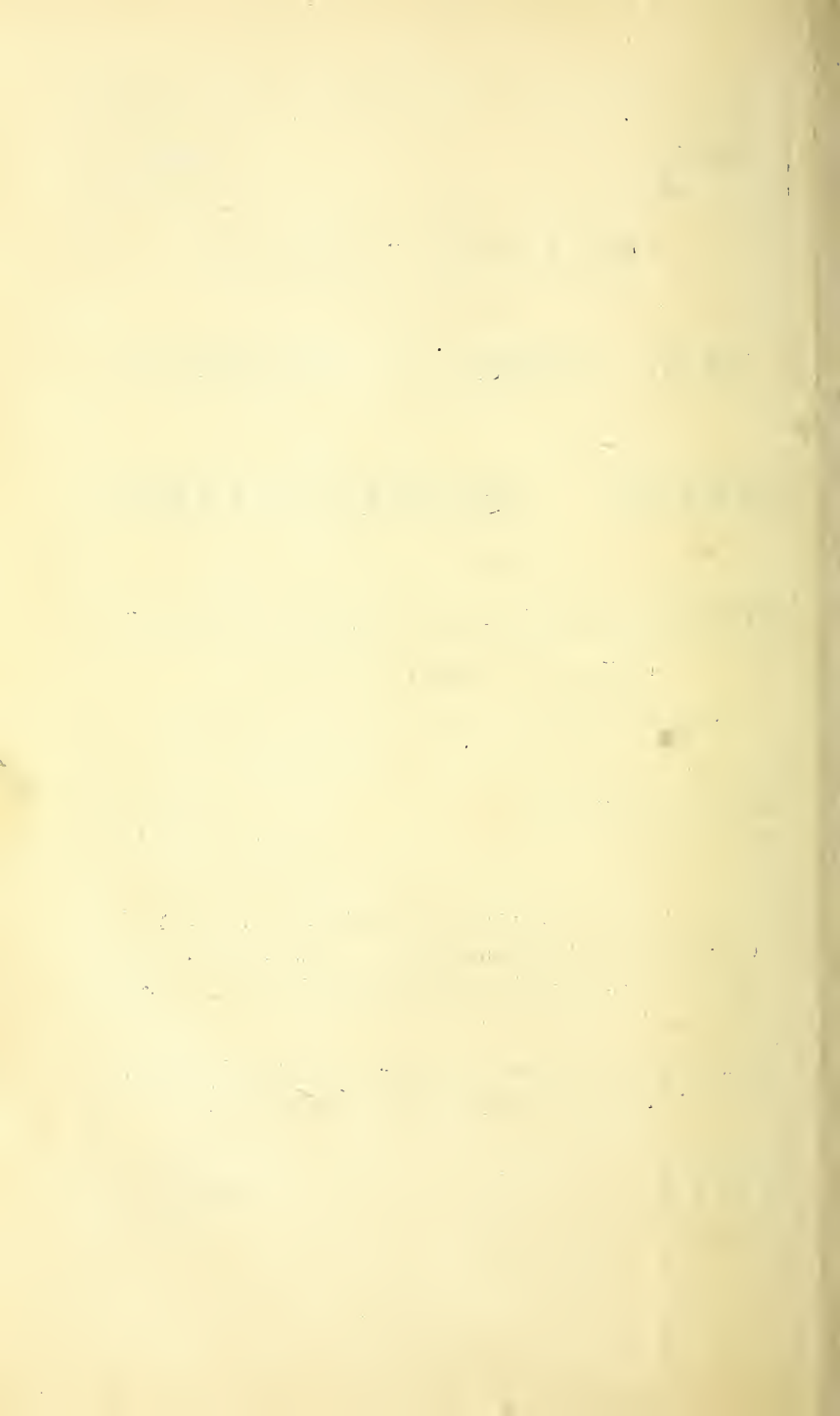

# CONSTITUTION

---

- Art. 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.
2. The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds and in all the world, and in this work the association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.
3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this association and three delegates from each church who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.
4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.
5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.
6. The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distributing to the churches the proceedings of the body.
7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the association, pay them out as the association may direct and make a report to each annual session.
8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.
9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive committee of three brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention making to the next session a report of the work done and of the general State Mission work.
10. The Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest church letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association.
11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.
12. The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.
13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES.

1 We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost and that these three are one.

2. We believe that the Bible, the Old and New Testament is the word of God and the only rule of Faith and Practice.

3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4. We believe that salvation is by grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5 We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6 We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.

7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

## RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed till he has been recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking.

7th. Called roll of churches, thereupon thirty churches responded and handed in their letters which were read by the Clerk assisted by J. W. Duncan, an enrolled list of messengers whose names will appear at the close of these proceedings.

8th. On motion, the Association proceeded to permanent organization by electing Prof. J. C. Goodman, Moderator and M. M. Blevins Clerk and Treasurer by acclamation.

9th. Read Constitution, Abstract of Principles and Rules of Order.

10th. On motion, that section 10 of the constitution be amended, stating that the Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September at 11 A. M. and that the word time be stricken from said section of the constitution.

19th. The Moderator extended an invitation to visiting brethren; Revs. J. F. Fletcher, W. A. Hash, and Bro. W. C. Fields, of New River; Bro. N. H. Jones, of the Alleghany; Rev. W. R. Bradshaw, of the South Fork Associations, reported themselves, were extended the hand of welcome by the Moderator and seated with the Association.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

20th. Your Executive Committee submits the following report of the funds collected, and of the work done during the year just closed. We have received from all sources \$71.56: your committee tried to ascertain the condition of the churches, as much as possible by letter correspondence, as well as otherwise, after gaining what information we could we decided that Long Branch, Peak Valley, Mountain View, Pleasant Hill and Zion Hill churches, were the most needy, and gave promise of growth and development, and as they called Pastors and engaged in church work, they were aided to the amount of ten dollars (\$10.00) each out of the funds before named.

Forest Home and Apple Grove were aided five dollars each, upon the agreement that they would pay what they had pledged to this work and secure pastors, which they did. The same promise was made to Windfall church, through one of its members, but your committee is uninformed as to whether a pastor was called or the pledge paid, we think that these churches have strengthened by this plan of work, and the aid furnished. Your committee could have spent much more in this work to a good purpose, in most all of our churches. Infact the little which was done is as nothing compared with the vast needs and destitutions of our entire field, some of our churches, which were not aided, are almost or quite as needy and worthy of aid as the ones aided, and some and perhaps all of those aided are still in need of aid, while there are others destitute and waiting points needing our attention where there is no organization. Infact the entire bounds of our Association is in a measure destitute of Baptist preaching.

"The field is white unto harvest." Your committee urges upon this Association, the great importance of a stronger and

better organized effort upon the part of all our people to supply the different points with regular preaching, we recommend, that the different churches, make pledges to this object and that individuals be ask to aid in this effort and that we make an effort to reach all of our people and solicit their aid in this work.

All true Christians ought to sacrifice more for the success of the gospel in all the bounds of our beloved State. If the Baptists of our Association only appreciated their own individual salvation as they should, then surely they would become more zealous, for the salvation of others. Brother, how much do you appreciate the fact that the gospel was brought to you, and that you accepted Christ upon its terms? Let us show our faith by our works. Your committee recommends that the Clerk appoint a committee of three members of each church to hold rallies in behalf of State Missions during the three first months of the ensuing year.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Foreign Mission Board is in the glorious work of Evangelization. It is appointed by the Southern Baptist convention for this stupendous task. Splendid opportunities are before us. China with 440,000,000 of people is passing through a marvelous transformation. Now is the time to give these millions the gospel. Japan is leading the orient, shall we lead Japan to Christ? Mohammedanism threatens to submerge Africa. Shall we turn back the tide by the power of the gospel. South America, Mexico and Italy are sick and tired of Romanism. They are ready to receive the gospel, which we have to give, vast open doors which we have not yet been able to enter lie before us. We have sent out 273 missionaries, thirty of them sent out last year. They have gathered around them 531 Native helpers and are training hundreds of others. The Missionaries reported 3618 Baptisms last year. There are seven women training schools with 140 students and nine Theological training schools with 212 students. There are fifteen Medical Missionaries, treating many thousands of patients, opening the way to the hearts and homes of millions of people. We have seven hospitals in which the Missionaries assisted by five Native helpers, treated 40,716 patients. The printing presses are sending out the Bible and millions of pages of religious literature in the language of the people. An accumulated debt of \$89,600 now rests upon the work. This should be paid off this year.

We recommend that all our people help by sympathy and prayer, and by self denying sacrifice by all, and by liberal gifts, and that we solemnly pledge ourselves to do all in our power to raise the amount \$30,00 which has been ask of our Association this year.

#### REPORT OF HISTORIAN

40th. In 1755 Shubal Steams and his brother-in-law Daniel Marshal, came from Virginia to Guilford County to Sandy Creek, now in Randolph County, N. C., held a protracted meeting and organized a church named Sandy Creek. Steams remained there in these years. In 1758 the first Association in Virginia or North Carolina, was organized by them. The Sandy Creek Association, that Association covered all the territory now covered by Western North Carolina, East Tennessee and Southwest Virginia. There were four churches belonging to it that is now in what is known as East Tennessee.



In 1790 the Yadkin Association, 100 miles or more west of Sandy Creek, was organized. It covered the western part of the territory of old Sandy Creek. Fox Creek church now in Grayson county Virginia, Sugar Grove and St. Clair's Creek in Smyth County, Virginia, belonged to it. My great grandfather George McNeil from Scotland was its Moderator, Thomas Johnson was a delegate at the organization of the Yadkin Association. They appointed two or three men to travel as missionaries and appointed a Trustee to receive and distribute the funds. Andrew Baker came to old Fox Creek church, preached and went over to Smyth county to Sugar Grove and St. Clair's Bottom. In 1799 the Mountain Association was set off from the Yadkin Association. It covered the greater part of the Southwest Virginia and all of Wilkes county west of the Blue Ridge and had seven churches east of the mountains. Those east of the mountains were constituted into the Roaring River Association. Afterwards the Mountain Association set off the Watauga and Senter Associations. In 1821 at Lewis meeting house in Wilkes county, the Briar Creek Association was organized from the Yadkin Association. In 1848, Oct. 30th, The Jefferson Association was organized at Liberty church near Jefferson N. C. In 1871 The Jefferson was reorganized into the New River at Baptist Union church, Grayson County, Virginia. In the year of 1886 the Ashe and Alleghany Association was organized with nine churches, six from Ashe and three from Alleghany counties at Buffalo church. Elder T. M. Honeycutt was President and H. A. Eller, Secretary. Elder G. W. Green was present and drew the Constitution. The first session after the organization was held with New Hope church in Alleghany county, 1887. Quite a number of visitors were there to-wit: Revs. E. F. Jones, S. M. Collis, Iredell Privett, and others. The first Executive Committee, W. C. Fields, G. H. Phillips and James Eller.

# CONSTITUTION

---

Art. 1 This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2 The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bonds and in all the world, and in this work the association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3 The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this association and three delegates from each church who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4 At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5 The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6 The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distributing to the churches the proceedings of the body.

7 The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the association, pay them out as the association may direct and make a report to each annual session.

8 The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9 At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive committee of three brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention making to the next session a report of the work done and of the general State Mission work.

10 The Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest church letters Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11 Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12 The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13 This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

Eller and Brethren E. J. Norris and George Roten of the Three Forks, Rev. Geo. M. Reeves of the Alleghany Associations, Rev. W. R. Bradshaw, representing State Missions, Rev. W. D. Bostic, of Pochow, China and sister Blanche Barbus of Raleigh, N. C., representing the Womans' Missionary Union reported themselves and seated with the Association.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

17 North Carolina has had state wide prohibition since 1908. Four other states and 90 per cent. of the remaining territory of the entire South, have laws forbidding the sale of intoxicating liquors. It has been a great blessing to this state as well as to all dry territory. The church has been a great factor in bringing about the spendid results already achieved; but the battle, it seems is just begun, and we must fight on 'till the complete victory is won

As the state law in many instances is violated, and the federal law allowing parties outside our state and other dry territory, to ship liquors into territory forbidding the sale of intoxicants, should be changed. Therefore we insist that every member of our Association and churches do all that can be done for the enforcement of the state law, and also that every citizen write to the Senators and Representatives in Con-

gress, to support the now pending Sheppard-Kenyon bill, which will prohibit the shipment, under the guise of Inter-State Commerce, of liquor into dry territory, when shipment is intended to be used in violation of the law of the state in which delivery is to be made.

We urge that the Ashe Baptist Association continues to wage an uncompromising fight against the liquor traffic, which we regard as one of the greatest enemies of the human race.

## REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

32 Dear Brethren, The following is the report of your Executive Committee after considerable loss of time by correspondence your Committee succeeded in securing the services of Elder Geo. M. Reeves, for half a years work, as an Evangelistic Missionary in this Association.

He began work in the late fall and was aided by Elder C.M. Cope, who afterwards was secured as Missionary to work under the appointment and pay of the State Mission Board. These brethren held meetings with a number of churches and at other points, Goodly numbers were added to the churches by baptism and the cause stenghtened.

One church was organized at Orion four miles south east of Jefferson with hopeful out look, and a house of worship nearing completion. These brethren have given preaching to the church at Jefferson twice per month, and held a series of meetings with good results, the church is in much better condition than a year ago, Elder C.M. Cope has given monthly preaching to Orion and Jefferson churches also a mission point at Peak Creek, and preached at many other points. He and Elder Reeves have visited nearly all the churches in the Association. They regret that they did not have time and opportunity to hold protracted meetings with all the churches, we are glad to report that in our opinion most or all our people are encouraged at the results of the years work, we believe that the spirit attended the efforts of these servants as well as those of our pastors, so we thank God and take fresh courage for the future. Bro. Reeves looks to the pledges made by churches and individuals for his remuneration. Therefore we urge upon all who have not yet paid their pledge to do so now. Elder Cope is expected to remain on the work till the end of this conventional year which comes early in December, We regret to state that we have been unable to appropriate any of the funds pledged to aid weak or pastorless churches, for the following reasons: The churches failed to inform your committee of the needed and desired aid. Though they have called and secured pastors and were aiding them all they were able.

Second because many of the pledges were not paid early enough to enable the committee to make any safe calculation on what amount would be furnished. So whatever amount has been furnished for this purpose is yet unused.

In view of the good results attained by our last year efforts of the needs of our territory and churches and of the urgency of the work throughout the State, your committee recommends that we endeavor to raise by individual and church pledges not less than (400.00) four hundred dollars to prosecute the work in our own Association, and that we pray and labor for the success of the work severally and collectively during the entire year. We your committee add

to this report that in the meetings held and the work done by Revs. Reeves and Cope that there has been 130 or more souls professed faith in Christ and 50 or more have been baptized into the churches. We further recommend that the two ministers now at work in this field be retained, and that more active steps be taken on the part of the churches and lay members in looking after and caring for the needs of those who labor so zealous for the Master we feel that the demands of the different churches should arouse to their respective duty and see that our pastors are provided for and not forced to quit the field or neglect their loved ones at home.

We also feel that our beloved Brother W. R. Bradshaw who has been so faithful to attend our Association is entitled to our most sincere and heartfelt thanks for the great work he has done for us.

### REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

50 From the annual report of Thomasville Baptist Orphanage for the fiscal year ending June the 15, 1912, we had in the Orphanage at that date 372 children an average for the year 371 children. The amount of money received during the year from all sources was \$ 79,288.66

The amount paid for the care and support of 372 children for the year was \$ 39,137.76

Leaving \$ 40,150.90

Of this amount \$ 39,939.45 was applied on the indebtedness of the institution, interest on the same, internal improvements, furnishings, etc.,

Leaving not yet expended \$ 211.45

Of this amount \$ 33,827.30 came in as the current fund and a liberal part came from the earnings of the different departments of the work carried on by the Orphanage.

The actual cost per month per capita for food, clothing and the high standard of moral, physical and mental training is the small sum of \$8.78. The year was a glorious one, in the

amount and high grade of work done in the school and otherwise, The current fund was very satisfactory, but there is a great increase in demand to keep this work going as there are a large number of applications for admission but they have to be turned down for want of room.

The sanitary conditons of the instituion are excellent, no deaths or serious illness reported during the year. Now brethren, there is still a greater privilege to aid in this glorious work than ever before. Brother W. L. Kenedy and his wife have given to the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage, a farm of 1200 acres, valued at about \$100,000.00 and the managers of the institution are planning to establish a branch orphanage on this farm. In order to do this they must have buildings and equipments, for this work, To whom can they make this appeal for the funds except the Baptist of North Carolina? Let each member of this Association do their part in this great work, by so doing they will be blessed by the Lord. Respectfully, submitted,

## CONSTITUTION

Art. 1 This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2 The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3 The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership, and work of the church.

4 At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5 The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6 The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing, and distributing to the churches the proceedings of the body.

7 The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the association, pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report to each annual session.

8 The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9 At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an Executive committee of three brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10 The Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest church letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11 Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12 The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine, or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13 This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1 We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost and that these three are one.

2 We believe that the Bible, the Old and New Testament is the word of God and the only rule of Faith and Practice.

3 We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4 We believe that salvation is by grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5 We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6 We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.

7 We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8 We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9 We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

### RULES OF ORDER.

1 Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2 When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.

3 When a member wishes to speak he shall rise

address the Moderator and not proceed till he has been recognized.

4 No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5 No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6 No member shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

18 Your Committee secured the service of Elder Geo. M. Reeves for one-half of his time to work as an Evangelistic Missionary and to preach once a month to Jefferson and Orion churches. He began his work early in December at the beginning of the Conventional year. He reports to us that he has worked in six meetings in which were about fifty professions of faith in Christ and about twenty baptisms as a result of these meetings and has delivered two sermons per month to Jefferson and Orion churches. The work at Jefferson has been moving splendidly, had a good meeting there in April. The Sunday School there is doing well. Bro. Reeves has delivered eighty or more sermons and traveled more than 800 miles. His one-half year work will not be done until he fills his appointments at Orion to Nov. the first and at Jefferson to Dec. the first.

Your Committee also secured the service of Rev. W. J. Banks as an Evangelistic Missionary for all his time to work in the northern part of the Association. He began his work early in December 1912, and has done a most wonderful work. He reports to your Committee that he has delivered 218 sermons, witnessed 106 conversions and additions to the churches by Bap-

tism and letters 100, and has received for his work \$124.25, also has received from State Mission Board \$150.00 Total \$274.25 and has collected for Missions \$16.00. He has supplied two churches Meadow View and Baptist Home, and organized four Sunday Schools. he has done all he could do on account of bad health. Bro. Banks secured the aid of Rev. Geo. M. Pennington to aid him in this work and to fill his appointments when he (Banks) was unable to do so.

We are gratified with the work that has been done during the past year, and are anxious for the work to go forward, your committee recommend that the churches form fields where possible as a means to secure pastors, and that the Association provide means at this session to prosecute and continue this work in our Association. Being mindful of the fact that new enterprises are coming among us with a new population of people. We as a body of Baptist brethren should awake, and see our needs and take no backward step in this work, but do as much or more at this session with our means in pushing this work than we have in the past year, to carry on the mission work in our bounds. The Bible way to secure these means is found in first Corinthians 16th chapter and second verse, upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him, that there be no gathering when I come.

#### REPORT MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

21 The Baptist Ministers Relief Board was established twenty-three years ago, during that time it has given relief to one hundred and three beneficiaries, ministers and ministers widows. There are at present thirty-six dependent upon this board. This is the greatest number ever receiving aid from this board at

one time. There are several applications now pending showing that the increase of beneficiaries may be expected to continue. The beneficiaries receive from twenty-five to two hundred dollars per year. Many of them need more, some of them have no other means of support. That the aid extended may be adequate to the needs of the beneficiaries, it is frequently necessary to increase the appropriation. The expense of the board last year was more than usual because of the board sending a representative to a number of the Associations. The falling off of the board's receipts for the last two years of \$800—\$600 in 1911 and \$200 in 1912. The increasing number of beneficiaries and the necessity of giving more aid to those already aided because of the high cost of living makes an increase of funds imperative, hence the sending of a representative, it is the aim of this board that no one who has been a worthy proclaimer of God's truth shall suffer for the necessities of this life. We desire that every Baptist of the Ashe Association have a part in this great work. Let us hear the call and heed the same by a liberal contribution for those worthy brethren and their widows, your committee recommend that each church of the Ashe Association take a collection on the Sunday of their meeting nearest Christmas for this cause.

On the other hand, we regret that the ministers of our Association are not in reach of, or in touch with these great institutions. The nearest Baptist school to our Association is the Oak Hill School. We hope that our people may awake to their opportunity and begin to take more interest in that school than they have done heretofore. At the least, Brethren, let us take the Recorder into our homes, and with it and an open Bible, let us learn, why we are, what we are.

REPORT FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Foreign Missions is a work left by Christ for the church to do, same as all other christian work. The command is go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel. Until this is done the command is not obeyed. The world is ready and invites the Gospel. Heathen lands are more approachable than ever before. Consecrated men and women offer their efforts and lives in the work. The workers at the front beg for more laborers. The board is paralyzed by debt for work all ready done, it is urged to increase the force on many fields, and to enter others. It is powerless to do so, only as the churches respond to the call for increase.

The convention has 275 Missionaries and 571 native workers on the different fields, and yet in most fields and in many ways the work is only begun. During last conventional year there were 4,532 baptisms, \$543,446 was raised for the work last year. Forty years ago less than \$50,000 was raised for this work. We have \$900,000 in equipment of foreign fields, in the way of schools, publishing plants, hospitals etc. The membership of our churches on the foreign fields is reported at 27,545. The practacability of foreign missions has been demonstrated. The Bible is printed in 540 languages, and more christian rulers than the world has had hitherto. Now seems an oportune time for our best efforts; while God is overturning Horay Systems of error in every land. He is giving to us in the Southland wealth and prosperity beyond our expectations and adding thousands annually to our numbers. With all these encouragements, and more, let us take fresh courage to prosecute this work with more faith and energy.

Your committee suggests that special emphases be placed upon tithing as a minimum standard of giving. We recommend that this Association take no backward step in this work of last year, but if practical to go farther for the incoming year, also that we remember to pray for the success of this work. #### REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

51 The first child was received into the Orphanage Nov. 11, 1885. Since that time 1,420 children have been enrolled, and the present number is 411. Average cost per child about \$100 a year.

This Association has 10 children in the Orphanage costing some body about \$1000 a year. This Association is paying less than \$100 a year for the support of

these 10 children, hardly enough to care for one child a year, Brethren let us make an effort to care for, at least one third of these children.

At the Kennedy Memorial Home which is located in Lenoir County two dormitories are in process of erection and will be ready for the reception of children by Jan. 1st. It is hoped that sufficient funds will come to completely equip this part of the institution so that the work there may go forward without interruption. About half of the necessary funds have been secured.

A valuable gift has been made to the Orphanage consisting of 375 acres of land in Transylvania county by Miss Mary and Victoria Galloway. This place is estimated to be worth \$25,000 but is not available during the lifetime of Miss Mary Galloway. Another notable gift was the bequest in the will of Dr. S. W. Little of Davie County which, is believed will turn into Orphanage treasure some \$25,000. These two great contributions in addition to a small sum left by the late John Pullen have all come since the beginning of the year 1913.

While we are grateful to record these noble gifts to the Orphanage, its constant enlargement requires a steadily increasing current fund. Bequests are usually put in some permanent memorial to the giver, and are never used to buy meat and bread for the children. That part of the work has always devolved on our churches and Sunday-schools and, please God, it may ever be so!

The greatest work of the Orphanage is in surrounding the children with a moral atmosphere and instructing them in spiritual things. A well organized Sunday school and church with their various departments such as Baraca and Philathea classes, missionary society, mission study classes, etc. furnish excellent facilities for the growth in knowledge and in the grace of giving, and above all pointing them to the Lamb of God who taketh away the sins of the world, is the supreme and crowning work of the institution.

About 40 per cent of the current fund comes from the monthly collections in the Sunday-schools and yet scarcely one third of our North Carolina Baptist Sunday-schools are giving these monthly collections. We strongly insist that every Sunday-school in this Association fall in line with this very sensible proposition and thus swell the number of monthly givers to this great object.

Our churches are magnifying Thanksgiving Day as a

time to make a liberal contribution to the Orphanage. We hope all our churches will duly observe this day. We would suggest that in many churches it is best to select a Sunday nearest Thanksgiving Day to hold this special service. This can be done to advantage on country fields. Do not neglect this offering. It gives the extra shove as we enter upon the winter months.

CHARITY AND CHILDREN is itself a great contributor to the Orphanage. Every Sunday-school ought to take a club of the paper and thus increase its circulation and usefulness. Special attention is called to our well equipped job plant,

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSION.

52 Two years ago the Ashe Association met with Healing Springs church, and during that session raised \$400 for State Missions. The State Board of Missions supplemented that amount with \$300. These amounts \$700 were used for Mission work in the Ashe Association. The same amount was raised for last year which has just closed.

The churches and the brethren of the Association are familiar with the work that has been done to the present sitting of this body, we feel sure that substantial progress has been made toward the development of our churches and people. The urgent need of this Association is the enlistment and development of our people along all lines of Missionary enterprises. There are in North Carolina about 240,000 Baptist, of this number about 170,000 are enlisted in active service for the Master. Of the 1990 churches in the state 1750 have preaching only once a month.

There are 31 churches in the Ashe Association, not a single church has preaching more than once a month.

The time being so long between preaching services and the pastors in most cases living entirely outside of the church neighborhood, renders the work that is done inefficient. None of the churches are doing as well as they might do, and a good number of them are doing practically nothing for Missions. An earnest effort should be put forth to enlist all these churches into active service, They need to be awakened to a sense of

their full duty to the support of their Pastors. We recommend that a faithful effort be made to group the churches into fields that can and will support a wide awake aggressive Pastor that can meet the demands of the times. A number of our churches could and ought to maintain twice a month preaching. In view of the great need and present conditions and the outlook to the future, we insist that the Association raise not less than \$500, for State Missions, within the next Associational year a railroad will have been built through Ashe county from the Virginia line to Watauga county, N. C. Branch lines from this road will be built into other sections of the county where there are valuable mineral deposits and timber. The prospect is good for a railroad connection with other parts of the State, south and east of the Blue Ridge in the near future. Rapid progress is going to be made along all commercial lines. Business interest will develop by leaps and bounds, in material affairs, will we be as active and energetic about the work and development of our Lord's Kingdom. We should do so for we have in Matt. 6-33 the Command to 'Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His Righteousness.' The Lord's work is the most important of all, we regard this time with the in coming of a railroad and new classes of people a serious critical yet. an opportune time for our denomination in Ashe county. We can advance or retard the work of the Kingdom as we choose

Some Reasons Why a Church Have a Woman's Missionary Society.—by Mrs. R. H. Goodman.

In the first place I would say a church should have a Missionary Society because I believe it to be one of the best organizatlons in the church. It will enlighten our people more than any thing I have found. When we meet together and study our mission studies, read the Bible and pray, and seek Divine guidance in our work, it is then that we are moved to sacrifice of our means to send the gospel to benighted souls. When we really learn how they bow to idols and practice all kinds of superstitious beliefs, and then read where



Christ said "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," we begin to see and realize the blessings there are in store for those who are trying to do something for the One from whom cometh every good and perfect gift. I believe if our people would become enough interested in missions to read after our work and earnestly pray for it, it would then be a pleasure instead of a burden for us to pay our dues to the Lord. Our Secretaries and leaders come to us occasionally and tell us about the work. We try to listen and profit by the information, but in our daily lives our minds are so taxed with our home affairs that it is easy for us to forget and neglect our duty. It is in the home filled with mission literature that we are able to quietly read and study for ourselves. There we may as we read, commune with our dear Lord, and from Him learn our duty to God and our fellow-being. And having learned our responsibility to God, we will plan for larger service and greater gifts.

Another reason is that we should try to get our children interested in church work. It seems to me that our young people are too much neglected. They come into our churches, are baptized and recognized as full members. After a few months unless they are given something to do they decide they just as well be somewhere else, and they begin to drift away. Soon they become cold and unconcerned and are not sure whether they are Christians or not. If we give our young people some work, suited to them, they will grow up to be strong men and women and unshakable in the faith. Let them understand that God never saved a soul without a purpose. So to fill this need, let us give our boys a Royal Ambassador Chapter, our girls a Young Womans Auxiliary and our children a Sunbeam Band. Then let us as mothers go to work in our Missionary Societies, giving ourselves in God's service, and surrendering our lives to be used by Him as He sees best.

#### SYSTEMATIC GIVING.—by Mrs. J. O. Goodman.

There is not one principle of the Christian religion more clearly, forcibly and conspicuously taught in the scriptures than the principle of giving. We find in Genesis 28:22 that the giving of the tenth was inaugurated by Jacob as the final consummation of his vow to God. The giving of the tenth did not pass with Jacob,

but became the law of the Jewish Sanhedrin and permeates the whole of the Old Testament Scriptures as well as that of the New.

But the problems that confront us today and which must be solved by us are: 1st, Why must we give? 2nd, In what spirit? 3rd, In what manner?

In discussing the first of these propositions, we believe that because God Almighty so loved the world as to give His only begotten Son, Jesus Christ, to come to this sin-cured world and die the ignominious and cruel death of the cross at the hands of the Roman soldiers, that you and I might have life eternal, and that the world might be redeemed. Because we ourselves have been redeemed and our sins forgiven through the giving of Jesus Christ to the world, and on account of this unspeakable gift of God, all Christians are obligated and duty bound to carry the gospel of Jesus Christ to the world by means of giving. Christ gave himself for us, then commanded us to give the gospel to the world. How are we to do this? Many of us can never go to foreign fields and preach to a dying people, but we can out of God-given means, make it possible for others to go. The world can never be evangelized until God's people send the gospel, because we believe it is God's purpose to save by human agencies. God has given all and made it possible for the world to be saved, and the work of Christianizing the world has been delegated to you and me and the followers of Christ. Hence we conclude the answer to our first proposition by saying, we must give and give much if the world is to be saved.

As to the spirit in which one must give. We must give freely, not grudgingly, give because we love the souls of lost men, give because Christ gave, give because we love to give, give because 'tis noble to give, give remember that the gifts without the giver is bare. James Russell Lowell very beautifully demonstrate the spirit in which one should give, in the Vision of Sir Launfall when he said:

"I behold in thee an image of Him who died upon the tree:

Thou also hast had thy crown of thorns,  
Thou hast had the worlds buffets and scorns.

And to thy life were not denied  
The wounds in the hands and feet and side.

Mild Mary's Son acknowledge me, Behold through

Behold through Him I give to Thee.  
In what we share with another's need.  
Not what we give, but what we share,  
For the gift without the giver is bare."

This verse so beautifully, so forcibly, teaches us the spirit of consecration and self sacrifice which must accompany true giving. No nobler gift may be made, no nobler principle manifested, than self consecration, self-sacrifice. Again we quote "The gift without the giver is bare."

We now desire to speak very briefly as to the method or manner in which one should give. Let us systematize our giving, by giving at stated times and giving or fixed amounts. The world demands certain systems and methods of transacting its business, and those who transact the business of the world in a thoroughly systematic way or the world's greatest leaders and most successful men. Now shall the greatest business ever delegated to the children of men, the Kings business, the redemption and salvation of the world; a business coveted by Angels, be transacted in a careless way and in indifferent manner? Nay, verily, but let us arise and cloth ourselves with the armour of faith and go about God's work in a systematic way, because the harvest is great and the laborers few.

## CONSTITUTION

Art. 1 This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2 The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3 The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership, and work of the church.

4 At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5 The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6 The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing, and distributing to the churches the proceedings of the body.

7 The treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the association, pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report to each annual session.

8 The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9 At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of three brethren, who shall look after the constitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10 The Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session on the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest church letters, Finance Place and Preacher for next Association.

11 Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12 The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13 This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1 We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost and that these three are one.

2 We believe that the Bible, the Old and New Testament is the word of God and the only rule of Faith and Practice.

3 We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.



4 We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5 We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6 We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.

7 We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to Glory.

8 We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9 We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

### RULES OF ORDER

1 Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2 When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.

3 When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed till he has been recognized.

4 No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5 No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the moderator.

6 It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

By this is meant Mission work in the Southern States, The Island of Cuba, the Canal Zone, Mountain Schools, together with work among Foreigners, Indians and Negroes.

A partial summary of last years work follows, viz: Workers employed 1,447 part of whom were teachers. Baptisms reported

30 861. Total additions to churches 56,747. Churches Constituted 172. Houses of worship built and improved 375 Sunday Schools organized 758. Bibles and Testaments distributed 110,612. Mountain Schools 32 with 156 teachers and 5,218 pupils, 78 of whom are Ministerial students. The current expenses last year, of the Board was \$397,589.12 and yet the demands for aid was so great that the Board was forced to report a debt of \$6,249.33. Upon this Board devolves the evangelizing of the Foreigners as they come to us, also the Indian and Negro population of the Southern States together with the Island of Cuba and the Canal Zone of Panama.

In view of the vast field and the importance of the work, and of the signal blessings of God upon this work in the past. How important it is for us to carry this work forward with energy.

Let us arise in our strength and do our whole duty to this work by prayer and contribution.

Your Committee recommend that all our churches make an effort to interest each and all its members in this work.

#### ORPHANAGE FELLOWSHIP.

25 The care of the unfortunate is a natural and fundamental expression of Christianity. Jesus was in his ministry what he would have us be. He emphasized things fundamental and cast the program for all ages. He glorified childhood and so related his gospel to the physical wants of life that we cannot hope to save the soul unless we also provide for the body.

So far Orphanage work has been the principal form of our benevolence, largely because it has been showing the most tangible results. It has been said by some that it is necessary only to let the people know the needs of the Orphanage and they will be well supplied, the coming year will show whether this is true or not. With only four hundred and thirty children we have fallen behind.

Children are already being received at the Kennedy Home.

The Miles Durham nursery for very small children, at Thomasville, will be completed before the winter months. If this is filled with children and we provide for those that are at the Kennedy Home, the current expenses must be increased \$10,000 over last year.

Among North Carolina Baptists nothing has so excited men and women in the work of the Kingdom as the Orphanage work. It has been the agency for the promotion of harmony, liberality and consecration. Thus in the larger work of the Kingdom the little child is the leader.

Since the reception of the first child, Nov. 11, 1885, 1516 have been enrolled and the present number is 480.

Average cost per child \$167.64 a year. The health record of the children for the passed year has been remarkable, there being no deaths and few cases of serious illness.

Large and valuable additions are being made to the plant at Thomasville. A modern dairy barn has been completed. This department of our work along with the various other industrial features are to be emphasized. A splendid auditorium will be completed within a year. The erection of this important and greatly needed building was made possible by the bequest of the late Dr. S. W. Little of Davie County, whose honored name it will bear. Three new school rooms have been added with improvements on the old

school building. A tenth grade has been put in the school course for the purpose of giving those who leave us a better preparation for life's struggles.

We would again urge and recomend; 1 That every Sunday school set aside one Sunday in each month as Orphanage day; 2 A club of Charity & Children in each Sunday school and an individual copy to pastors and all homes that are not represented in the Sunday school; 3 A liberal Thanksgiving offering emphasizing the importance of "WORK DAY," giving not less than one day's work to the Orphanage. We would suggest that in many churches it is best to select a Sunday nearest Thanksgiving day to hold this special service. This can be done to advantage on country fields.

Finally brethern let us constantly keep in mind the appeal of the larger Orphanage and remember as we save the child we not only save the State but we save ourselves and in doing this we find our greatest happiness

#### REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

There is a question that presents itself to this body which is — Has the time arrived in the bounds of Ashe Association when the churches demand educated ministers. It is an admitted fact, acknowledged by all true christians, that the main corner stone and foundation; is to be a true consecrated christian born of the Spirit of God and filled with the Holy Spirit, but second it becomes necessary for the minister to be educated in order that he may be in a position to preach the Gospel to all classes with force. There was a time when the uneducated minister was competent to do a great work, and did so, but that time is passing away and men and women have reached an intellectual level undreamed

of a half century ago by the masses.

The world today is flooded by literature and printed matter that has overleaped the bounds of conception and freighted down with the highest and lowest degree of art, literature, and morality and all midway shades. The human mind is eagerly devouring all that is spread out before it, be it, good or bad. Therefore it is as reasonable to try to maintain that California's fruit could be as successfully moved to Boston by the faithful ox team that slowly ploded his way across the great plains 75 years ago as it can be by the express trains that rush on their way at the rate of 40 or 50 miles per hour and often more, night and day, as to maintain that the illiterate minister can do a work equal to the educated. It is the duty of our churches to provide and to demand our ministers to educate themselves, which is in the reach of all, if he is willing to pay the price, which price is, prolonged and faithful study.

Imagine the awkward position that one is placed in, if he appears before a congregation to instruct them that is not at least partially familiar with current events of the world today, and could not tell nor even had no idea when the great nations of Egypt, Greece or Rome thrived, nor tell what great nation inhabits the banks of the historic Rhyne and where the broad Amison empty its waters, and about the time he commences his instruction his ignorance dawns upon himself as he looks at many faces in front of him, who are far his superiors in knowledge and so it is with the illiterate minister of today.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS,

46 The past year was one of the most successful years in the history of Foreign Missions. After 50 years work, there was reported in 1895 a total enrollment of 3,493 church members in foreign lands, and last year there were 4,532 persons baptized.

A wonderful opportunity lies out before us. Millions in heathen countries are waiting to hear the pure gospel. Shall we not give them the gospel of Christ. God is calling us to do our part in meeting our obligations to them. Thus far many of us have failed to do our duty in this work. Of the 23,659 churches in the Southern Baptist Convention, there are 10,023 which gave not a penny to Foreign Missions. The Supreme need of the hour and the unequalled opportunity of the times demand that the work must go forward.

Christ has given his church the commission to go and give to the uttermost parts of the world this its greatest need, the gospel of Christ.

3rd The gospel benefits everything it touches. If we would make our lives and churches tell for the greatest benefits to God and humanity we should put

forth our best efforts to give to the world the Gospel. It means to the heathen countries, civilization, education and prosperity as well as true Christianity.

4th Supporting Foreign Mission work means real unselfish giving. While all mission work begins at home, it must go on to every foreign field that has not the gospel. Giving to Foreign Missions develops the Christ spirit within us, and leads us out of self to work in behalf of others. See Matt. 13:38.

We earnestly plead with every church in this association to make an offering to Foreign Missions during the next year.

## CONSTITUTION

Art 1 This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2 The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3 The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership, and work of the church.

4 At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such a way as the association may direct, The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5 The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6 The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing, and distributing to the churches the proceedings of the body.

7 The treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the association, pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report to each annual session.

8 The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9 At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10 The Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session on the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education Baptist Organization, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest church letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association

11 Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12 The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any Churches that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13 This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.



## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1 We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost and that these three are one.

2 We believe that the Bible, the Old and New Testament is the word of God and the only rule of Faith and Practice.

3 We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4 We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5 We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6 We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are infellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.

7 We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to Glory.

8 We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9 We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

## RULES OF ORDER

1 Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2 When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.

3 When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed till he has been recognized.

4 No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5 No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6 It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking.

## REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission began work seventy years ago, when the Southern Baptist Convention was organized.

It has been a great force for a good during all these years, and there is hardly a neighborhood in all the territory of the convention that has not been bettered by its aid. A partial summary of last year's work is taken from the report of the Board. Viz: workers employed 1561. Baptisms reported 38,310 Total additions to church 63,970. churches constituted 215. houses of worship built and improved 220. S. S. organized 641, Bibles and Testaments distributed. 20,237 copies, Mountain Schools, 34, Teachers 172, Students, 5,218, of whom 88 were ministerial Students. \$530,266.84, was the total expenditure of this board last year, and the board thinks the present year report is the most glorious report in its history, notwithstanding the disturbance in the business world caused by the European war.

We should, seriously, consider the increased responsibility, that will rest upon Christian people of this Country, to give the Gospel to the world at large the when Nations of Europe shall cease hostilities and to protect our own County from the many errors that

will seek to find lodgement and favor here, when the Europeans realize their exhausted and ruined condition, as they will, when war is over, they will pore into our Country for employment and citizenship at a record breaking rate.

If our Home Mission Boards be prepared for such a crises well, if not we lose a great opportunity to honor God and serve humanity and retard the work of Missions perhaps indefinitely, we therefore recommend and urge upon the Churches the necessity of becoming alert to the situation and make special effort to interest and enlist the every member in this work. #### REPORT OF HISTORIAN

13 In 1755 Shubal Steams and his brother-in-law Daniel Marshal, came from Virginia to Gifford County to Sandy Creek, now in Randolph County, N. C., held a protracted meeting and organized a Church named Sandy Creek Steams remained there in these years. In 1758 the first Association in Virginia or North Carolina, was organized by them. The Sandy Creek Association, that Association covered all the territory now covered by Western North Carolina, East Tennessee and Southwest Virginia. There were four churches belonging to it that is now in what is known as East Tennessee. In 1790 the Yadkin Association, 100 miles or more west of Sandy Creek, was organized. It covered the western part of the territory of old Sandy Creek. Fox Creek Church now in Grayson County Virginia, Sugar Grove and St. Clair's Creek in Smyth County, Virginia, belonged to it. My great grandfather George McNeil from Scotland was its Moderator, Thomas Johnson was a delegate at the organization of the Yadkin Association. They appointed two or three men to travel as Missionaries and appointed a Trustee to receive and distribute the funds. Andrew Baker came to old Fox Creek Church, preached and went over to Smyth County to Sugar Grove and St. Clair's Bottom. In 1799 the Mountain Association was set off from the Yadkin Association. It covered the greater part of the Southwest Virginia and all of Wilkes County west of the Blue Ridge and had seven churches east of the Mountains. Those east of the mountains were constituted into the Roaring River Association.

Afterwards the Mountain Association set off the Watauga and Senter Associations. In 1821 at Lewis meeting house in Wilkes county, the Briar Creek Association was organized from the Yadkin Association. In 1848, Oct. 30th; The Jefferson Association was organized at Liberty Church near Jefferson, N. C. In 1871 The Jefferson was reorganized into the New River at Baptist Union Church, Grayson County, Virginia. In the year of 1886 the Ashe and Alleghany Association was organized with nine churches, six from Ashe and three from Alleghany Counties at Buffalo church. Elder T. M. Honeycutt was President and H. A. Eller, Secretary. Elder G. W. Green was present and drew the Constitution. The first session after the organization was held with New Hope Church in Alleghany County, 1887. Quite a number of visitors were there to-wit: Revs. E. F. Jones, S. M. Collis, Iredell Privett, and others. The first Executive Committee, W. C. Fields, G. H. Phillips and James Eller.

On September 24th and 25th, 1886, delegates from eight Baptist Churches in Ashe and Alleghany Counties met with the Buffalo Baptist Church, and organized the Ashe and Alleghany Associations with Rev. T. M. Honeycutt, as Moderator and Bro. H. A. Eller as Clerk. The annual sessions of said Association were held with the following Churches.

Clifton, Laurel Springs and Beaver Creek, 1890.

Mission Home, New River, Peak Valley and Obids, in 1891.

Liberty, and Zion Hill in 1894.

Meadow Veiv and Calloway's Chapel in 1895.

At the annual sessions mentioned in this report Brethern, T. M. Honeycutt, W. C. Fields, T. M. Duncan, and J. H. Dougton served as Moderators. Bro. H. A. Eller served as Clerk, contionusly, except at the 1895 session, when Rev. R. Shoaf served.

Pledges for the support of Missionary work in the two counties were made at the different sessions from 1886 to 1896, so the amount of One thousand one hundred sixty three dollars and fifty cents.

The financial tables giving the Church statistics shows only \$468.66 paid for the same purpose. What about the balance of \$694.84?

The State Board of Missions gave liberally to the support of the



work in the said counties from year to year, without which aid the Baptist cause in the two mentioned counties would have suffered greatly.

At these ten sessions the subjects of Education, Home Missions, Foreign Missions and the Baptist Orphanage received slight financial aid; also the churches increased from 9, with a membership of about 500 to 31, with a membership of about 1300.

At the 1896 session, held with Brushy Fork Baptist Church a committee was appointed to consider the advisability of dividing the Ashe and Alleghany Association.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

1 I, J. Fred Blackburn have visited twenty-seven Sunday Schools; made fifty two Sunday School addresses to large audiences.

2 At our last Session the respective delegates pledged fifty-seven dollars and fifty cents, of which amount only twenty nine dollars and ninety five cents has been paid.

3 On visiting the twenty-seven Sunday Schools, we found that

Only fourteen had evergreen Sunday Schools, that is keeping them open during the whole year. We by persuasion succeeded in getting the fourteen Sunday Schools, which had been closing during the winter to continue during the winter, thus establishing fourteen additional evergreen Sunday Schools.

4. We, your committee recommend that all our churches strive earnestly to increase the Sunday school attendance and institute the principle of systematic giving. Because we are forced to believe that the problem of giving can only be solved by systematic giving.

## 22. Report on Orphanage read and adopted.

### ORPHANAGE REPORT

Our Orphanage is the keystone in the arch of Christian service. If this stone is properly placed all the others in the arch will hold firm; if it is improperly placed the whole structure is in danger.

Love for the Orphanage among our brethren is intense but not universal. The great need is to lay upon the heart of every church and Sunday school the Orphanage obligation. If this consummation is ever reached the problem for ample support for the institution will be solved.

Owing to the large advance that has been made within the past year the Orphanage is heavily in debt. This brings the unpleasant necessity of making a large outlay for interest on borrowed money, which goes to banks instead of to the children. This ought not so to be. We are abundantly able to pay every dollar the institution owes this year, and if aole, we ought to be willing to

It is proposed to our people that the income of one day be sacredly set aside, at or near Thanksgiving day, and devoted to the Orphanage. If this would seize the hearts of our people and every man, woman and child would enter heartily into this loving service, every dollar of debt would be wiped out, and the institution would be free from the bondage that now hampers its work and curtails its usefulness.

We earnestly urge every member of the churches of this association to join this "work day" movement and give the proceeds of one day's labor or income to the Orphanage. We may do more but we should not do less.

Every Sunday school ought to set aside one Sunday in each month as Orphanage day and give the members an opportunity to make a contribution to the Orphanage. Only a little over one third of the Baptist Sunday schools are enrolled among this loyal band of monthly givers.

Every Sunday school ought to take a club of Charity & A children and an individual copy for pastors and homes that are not represented in the Sunday school. The paper is the right arm of the institution, and aside from the information and inspiration it furnishes, produces a good dividend for the support of the Orphanage.

During its thirty years of continued growth the institution has sheltered and trained over 1600 boys and girls, who are now out in the state as teachers, preachers, doctors, printers, farmers, business men and fathers and mothers of happy homes. There are 9 in various colleges and about a dozen in the denominational high

schools, The present number is 500—450 at Thomasville, 50 at Kennedy Home—with an average cost of \$113.23 per child or 31 cents the day, aggregating an annual cost of \$56,640.00

Our Orphanage has been enlarged and still the task looms before us as just begun. We urge every member of this association that they regard the Orphanage in larger terms as an opportunity unparalleled. This waiting door stands too wide for "same as last year" contributions to ever satisfy any working body of Baptists.

Your committee recommend:

1. A liberal Thanksgiving offering emphasizing the importance of "WORK DAY," giving not less than one day's labor or income to the Orphanage.

2. That every Sunday School will sacredly set apart the collection of one Sunday in each month for the support of the Orphanage.

3. That every Sunday School take a club of Charity and Children.

### 23 A.--Report on State Missions, Read and Adopted.

The work of State Missions, for the first twenty-five years of the convention's life, was known as Home Mission, after the organization of the Southern Baptist Convention, and the appointment of the home mission board, the name of the work in the state was changed from home missions to state missions. There is still some confusion as to these departments of our mission work. There are those who think that home missions mean work nearest home, and, therefore, in our State. The home mission board is located at Atlanta, and its missions is to all those states which are not able to cope with the destruction within their borders.

The work of the state board is confined to the state. While in some sections the Baptist are quite strong, numerically, in other portions of the state they are very weak, numerically, and can not maintain their regular worship unless aid from some outside source is extended.

No other department of our work has done so much toward strengthening our denomination, as state missions has done, half of the chusches in the state have been organized by the missionaries of the state board, and these churches are giving two-thirds of all that is given to carry on the work of the Lord. Between seventy and eighty-thou- and people have been baptized by the missionaries since the board began its work, eighty-five years ago.

#### A Dozen Years

Lest some may think, that we are dealing altogether with ancient history, let us consider some of the results that have been achieved during the last twelve years. There have been organized on our mission fields during this time, 50 churches and the missionaries reported over 20,000 baptisms. Two-hundred and twenty houses of worship have been built at a cost of over \$250,000, nearly 100 churches have become selfsustaining.

#### Last Year's Figures

The reports of the missionaries for last year show 2,137 baptisms, 2,638 professions of faith and 150 added by letter. 41 houses of worship were in course of construction and 13 were completed. Contributed to objects of the convention \$14,042.56 and total amount raised on mission fields, including pastors' salaries and church building. \$105,894.21 or more than twice as much as we received for state missions.

#### Work to be Done

Our greatest destitution is in the east, there are twenty counties

in the east, whose population in 1800 was 255,537 and in 1910 was 399,511 if the ratio of increase has been maintained we have in these twenty counties now 439,491 of which number about 200,000 are white, in the state as a whole one white person in every six is a baptist, while in the twenty counties we are considering one white person in every 38 is a baptist, so far as baptist are concerned the destitution is more than six times as great as in the state at large. In this section the board is expending more money than in any other. If any one is disposed to doubt the wisdom of the expenditure his attention is called to the fact that the Roanoke to which the board makes the largest appropriation led the state last year in its per-capita contributions, in North Carolina 880,000 of our people are professing christians leaving 132,000 who are yet unsaved as there are nearly as many baptist in the state as all other denominations put together, we are far more responsible for the future of our state religiously than any other denomination. In state missions we not only have an opportunity of giving the gospel to the people of our own state but we are adding to our denominational strength and are thereby making it possible to do more for all the interests of the kingdom.

Now in view of the fact that one beloved Sec. Dr. Livingston Johnson has accepted pastoral work and will give up the work as Sec. at our next convention, let us therefore rally to the cause of state missions as never before that he may not have to go out with a debt on our board.

## CONSTITUTION.

Art. 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2. The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership, and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6. The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing, and distributing to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

7. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the association, pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report to each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10. The Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session on the following subjects to wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest Church Letters, Finance Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any Church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.



## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.
2. We believe that the Bible, the Old and New Testament, is the word of God and the only rule of Faith and Practice.
- 3 We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
4. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.
7. We believe in, the final perseverance of the saints in grace to Glory.
8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgement.
9. We believe that the existance of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

 RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed till he is recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.
5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.
6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or, hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking

## REPORT on ORPHANAGE.

11. On Nov. 11th 1885, the first child was received at Thomasville Baptist Orphanage. The last one enrolled this year runs the number up to 1702. Present in 14 families, 500. Fifty applicants a month, and most of them turned away for lack of room.

It costs about one hundred and ten dollars a year to support one child, not including building and repairs. Children are received between the ages of two and twelve, and dismissed according to preparation rather than age. The expense bill averages about a hundred and fifty dollars a day.

The present indebtedness of the Orphanage is about \$25,000. This money borrowed from Banks or individuals, you will readily see, at 6% interest amounts to \$1500. a year, and if the institution was out of debt, this interest we are now paying would about support 15 children per year.

Recommendations: 1. We recommend that every wage earning Baptist in this association make a Thanksgiving offering of one day's wages.

2. That every S. S. give one Sunday's collection a month to the Orphanage.

3. That clubs of Charity and Children be taken by every S. S.

4. We recommend that you pray for these 500 children and those who have them and this work in charge. Committee.

The report on Temperance, and the above report. were read, and discussed by Rev's. W. R. Bradshaw, P. H. Haire, and adopted.

At the 1897 Session of the Ashe and Alleghany Association, held with Forest Home church, the committee appointed at the 1896 session to consider the necessity and advisability of dividing the Ashe and Alleghany Association recommended that a division with the county line was necessary and would be prudent.

Following this recommendation, letters of dismission were granted to all the Alleghany Churches when merged into another Association of same faith and order.

A committee was appointed to name Time and Place for organizing the Churches of Alleghany and any other churches into an Association.

Since then, the associatoin of the churches of Ashe County has been known as the Ashe Baptist Association.

Much greater good would have been accomplished, however, if the churches would have given more liberally to the support of the mission work. For the most part, the different objects of the Southern Baptist Convention were considered at each session and small financial aid rendered in some cases.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Southern Baptist Convention Board is sustaining 386 missionaries, occupying stations in seven foreign countries. Twenty three of these missionaries are from N. C. One of our latest gifts is Miss Pearl Johnson of Pittsboro, Chatham county, who left for China, Oct. 4, 1914. The missionaries are running 339 schools with 8833 pupils and 8 Hospitals and treated 56,949 patients.

#### HOME MISSION BOARD.

The Home Mission Board now in its seventy first year, receives with pride the many wonderful strides it has made for the promotion of Christ and His cause.

During these many years the Home Mission Board has had many struggles, but from its infancy it has been fostered by a faith and zeal that knew no fear, believing that the idea of this great mission work was prompt in the hearts of our pioneer brethren by the God of heaven and has been fostered and cared for by Him until it has now grown to be one of the greatest forces for good in the world. We recom-

mend that our Baptist brethren and all Christian people, bow to God and with grateful hearts render unto Him honor and praise for this great Institution for good. Many thousands of the lost have been led to Christ, and many enlisted in service for the Master.

During the last fifteen years, Southern Baptists have increased in members 61%. Our increase in baptisms for the past 15 years has been 105%. Our Mission contributions for 1915 were 353% over 1911, and our total increase to all objects 333%. For the past 16 yrs. our baptisms through the Home Board have increased 646%. As to our Finances, we have a deficit of \$72308. Receipts from the states have been \$370,590 against \$387,508 last year. Yet with matters as they are, the outlook as reported by the Board is good. There is yet ground for hope and cheer. Our hearts plea and prayer to God is that more attention among our brethren will be given the Home Mission board, and that a more spirited and generous giving be created among our people than ever before.

24 Report of Education read by Rev. Geo. M. Reeves. Discussed by Rev. Geo. M. Reeves, H. C. Tucker, Dr. S. L. Perkins, Rev. W. R. Bradshaw, and Rev. S. F. Cox and adopted.

#### REPORT on EDUCATION.

Education is one of the very important subjects of our denominational work and deserves our serious consideration. So much is involved in the final outcome of our Educational system that we should call into play our very best thoughts and efforts to make it what, from a Christian viewpoint it should be.

There is much in the modern system of higher education that tends to lead away from true Christianity and spirituality instead of to real, genuine Christian religion.

By the help of the Great Teacher we must have and adhere to a well organized system of education that will enable our Baptist people to successfully guard against the inroads that are being made in the minds and hearts of many young men and women by a secular and Christless system of education which injects doubt into their minds the final outcome of which is often an open and avowed scepticism or infidelity.

Out of what the world has regarded as its greatest universities has

come a school of higher critics and false teachers that have proven a curse to orthodox Christianity. Out of our orthodox Baptist schools has come most of our great leaders in every department of our denominational work that has brought to pass great things in the establishment, extension and development of the Kingdom of God.

A well educated and trained mind without an experimental knowledge of Christianity and developed spirituality, presents an element of great danger to the best interests of the Kingdom of the Lord. And to the opposite a well educated and trained mind that knows God experimentally and is cultivated spiritually, makes a great foe to the Kingdom of Satan.

All education that does not lead to God and the Bible is destructive in its final results. God is the center of all true education and around Him our entire educational fabric should be woven.

An unorthodox Baptist school or college would be a great menace to the spiritual life and power of the church. It would turn out a harmful, instead of a helpful body of ministers. Our ministerial students must be well educated and trained to enable them to measure up in efficiency to the opportunities and responsibilities that God has given them. All of our young people must be educated for effective work in the Kingdom. This training must come through our denominational schools.

We recommend that our people patronize Wake Forest, Meredith and our secondary schools. The Oak Hill school near us, on the Va. side, is a splendid school. Also the Baptist have in process of erection, a splendid brick building at West Jefferson in this association and if our people will give the right kind of support to this proposition, a great Baptist school can be built there. We insist that the Ashe association shall rise up to its opportunity here and give its moral and financial support to the West Jefferson school and save it to the Baptist cause of Ashe county.

It is our business to foster education in general, and our own schools in particular.

The educational work of our denomination is now consolidated under one board which is responsible for looking after the financial support of Wake Forest Meredith, our secondary schools and ministerial students, both at Wake Forest and the seminary. Dr. R. T. Vann of Raleigh is corresponding secretary of the work. It is asked that the churches contribute two fifths as much for this work as for State Missions. We want to insist that our association shall arouse itself and become thoroughly alive to its educational interests.

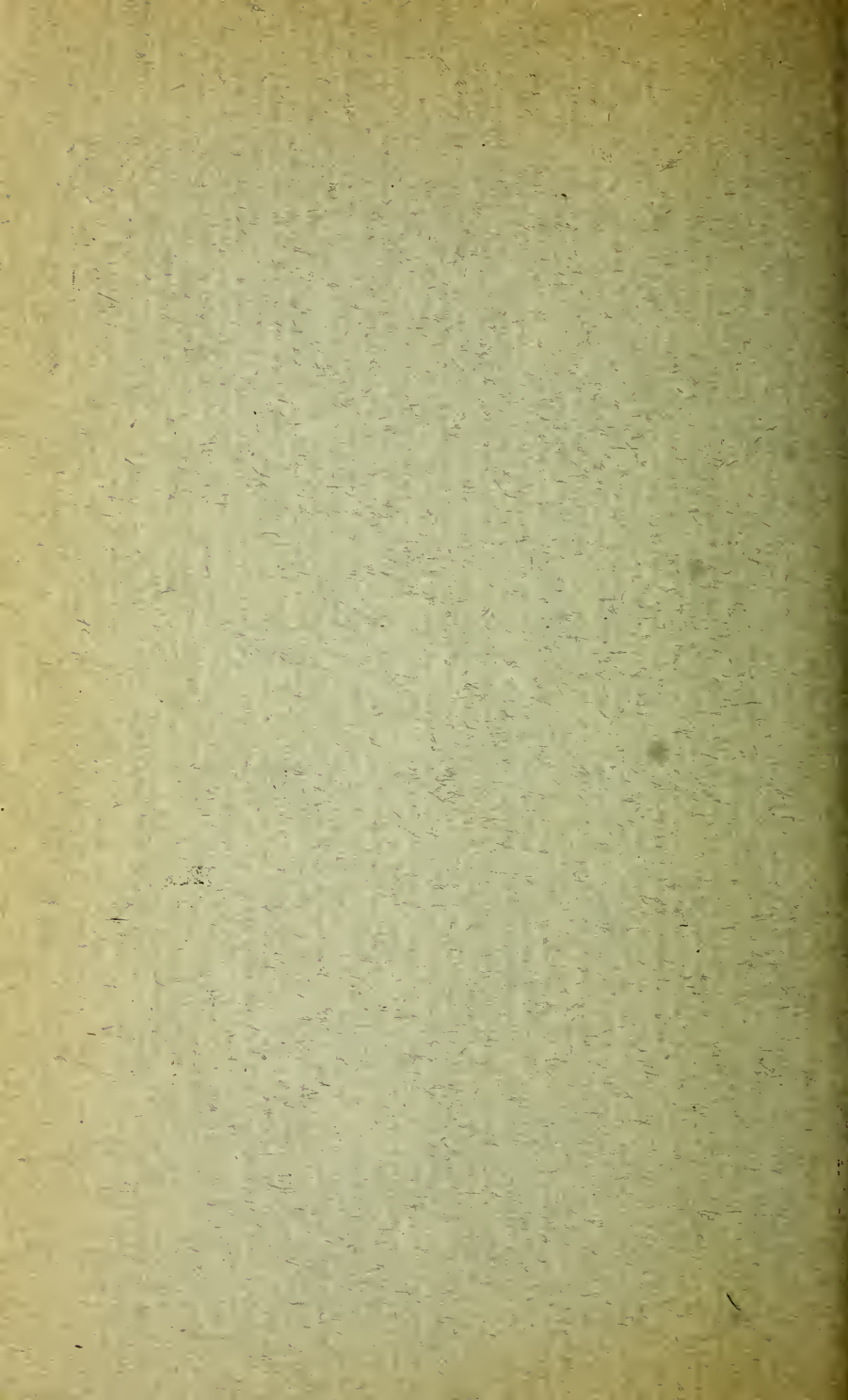

The next Annual Session will be held with Bald Mountain Missionary Baptist Church Beaver Creek, N. C., 5 miles West of West Jefferson, 3 miles West of Hamilton Station 1½ miles North of Donation Station, Tuesday after the first Sunday in September 1918. The introductory sermon to be delivered by Rev. C. M. Cope, alternate, Rev. R. M. Burkett.

## CONSTITUTION.

Art. 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2. The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership, and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers

6. The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing, and distributing to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

7. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the association, pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report to each annual session

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10. The Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session on the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any Church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.
2. We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testament, is the word of God and the only rule of Faith and Practice.
3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
4. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.
7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to Glory.
8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.
9. We believe that the existance of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

---

## RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed till he is recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.
5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.
6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house, or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking.

Increased interest in Missions and Orphanage has been manifested by the Ashe Baptist Association during the period of ten years,—reaching high tide at the 1913 session held with Obids Baptist Church when \$443.50 was pledged for State Missions. The association at the 1916 session held with New River Baptist Church when \$216.50 was pledged for the Orphanage, as against \$31.00 at the 1907 session held with Apple Grove Baptist Church.

Following is a list of the faithful ministers who served the Ashe Baptist Association as Missionaries during the period of ten years:—Elihu Tucker, Geo. M. Reeves, C. M. Cope, W. J. Banks, G M Pennington: J. Fred Blackburn Sunday School missionary for the associational year 1914-15.

The State Board of Missions very materially aided the cause of missions among us by supplementing our annual contributions in the sum of \$300.00 for the years 1913-14-15, smaller amounts were spent by the State Board for several years previous to these dates.

In the fall of 1915 and spring of 1916 our Baptist people were asked to donate the sum of \$1100 00 for the erection of a Missionary Baptist Church at the new town of West Jefferson, which they did. We were also asked to donate very liberally for the establishment of a Baptist School at the same place, about \$3,000.00 being paid by the Baptist of Ashe for this cause.

In consequence of these unusual financial calls upon our people there has been a stand still to some extent upon the subject of missions.

It is earnestly hoped that our people will rally again to the great cause of missions which is the foundation upon which we must build if we live and grow.

At the 1912 session held with Peak Valley Baptist church a Woman's Missionary Union was organized under the direction of Miss Blanche Barrus, of Raleigh. To the present time, our sisters generally have not shown sufficient interest in the work to make a success of it.

An unsuccessful attempt was made in the fall of 1913 and spring of 1914 to group the churches of the Ashe Baptist Association into fields. It is expedient for us that another attempt in this direction be made at an early date.

The next Annual Session will be held with Big Flats Missionary Baptist Church, Fleetwood, Ashe county, N. C., 2½ miles west of Bowie R. R. Station, Tuesday after the first Sunday in September 1919; the introductory sermon to be delivered by Rev. T. M. Hayse, alternate, Rev. W. F. Barker.

The Sunday School Convention to be held with Pilot Mountain church, about 1 mile from Riverside R. R. Station.

## CONSTITUTION

Art. 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2. The object of this association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6. The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing, and distributing to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

7. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the association, to pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report to each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10. The Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session on the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest Church Letters, Finance Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any Church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.
2. We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testament, is the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.
3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
4. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.
7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to Glory.
8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.
9. We believe that the existance of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

## RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed till he is recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.
5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.
6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house, or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking.

### REPORT on SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your committee on Sunday-schools find that twenty one of the twenty seven churches that have reported to this association, have had Sunday-schools. Eight of these have had an ever green Sunday-

schools. The balance have run from two to eight months with 119 officers and teachers. Pupils enrolled, one thousand two hundred and seventy two. Total enrollment 1391.

#### REPORT on ORPHANAGE.

We are being called upon for great sacrifices in the prosecution of the great war but we must not forget our obligation to the Orphanage. Prices are unprecedented. Forty cents a day is now required for the support of a child. Four years ago twenty seven cents covered the cost of maintenance. \$12.12 per month now; \$8.35 then.

525 children are now committed to the care of the Orphanage. The pressure for admittance into the institution grows stronger with the passing days. The war god will make new and larger demands upon the Orphanages of the state as the blood toll is taken.

The giving of the income of one day to the Orphanage saved us last year. It is vital to the Orphanage that another outpouring of tangible affections shall rescue the institution from the disaster of a great debt on next Thanksgiving. We earnestly urge all our people to make this extra offering, and to do all in their power to add to this list of generous givers.

The record of the Sunday-schools last year was also the best in the history of the Orphanage. The current fund was steadier than ever before, which is the test of loyal giving by these monthly contributions. The organized classes supported a larger number of children than ever, and we are glad to believe that interest in this form of Orphanage work is steadily growing.

The health record for the last year has been wonderful, and the general progress of the children has been good. We urge all our Churches and Sunday-schools to redouble diligence in their Orphanage work this year.

Your committee would again urge and recommend:

1. A more general reading of Charity and Children.
2. A monthly offering from each Sunday-school.
3. A liberal Thanksgiving offering emphasizing the importance of giving not less than ONE DAY'S WORK at some time during the Thanksgiving season.

Edgar, the son of Mr. & Mrs. Culver Parson, was born April 1, 1899, and killed on the battlefield of Manders in France on March 1, 1918, age 18 years and 11 months.

He volunteered into the U. S. army at Bluefield, W. Va., February 19, 1917 and was stationed at the following places before being sent to France viz: Columbus, Ohio; Sam Houston, Texas; Douglas Ariz.; Port Jersey and Hoboken, N. J. He was sent in the expeditionary forces to France in July 1917. He did not forget his mother and before sailing he made an allotment to her and also took out ten thousand dollars insurance of which she is now drawing \$57.50 every month for twenty years.

He was the first Ashe county soldier to lay down his life in this world's conflict that we all may remain free. He belonged to Company C, 18th Infantry and was buried with appropriate religious services and military honors in the French Military Cemetery at Manders on the same day that he was killed.

Sarah Lemery Campbell, daughter of A. L. and Mrs Lizzie Smith, was born at Stony Fork, Watauga county, N. C., Nov. 12th, 1894; died June 29, 1918; age 23 years, 7 months and 17 days; cause of death, toxemia. She professed religion and joined Beaver Creek Missionary Baptist church, and later, moved her membership to Bald mountain Baptist church and lived a faithful member till death.

She was married to J. T. Campbell December 28, 1913. There were born to this marriage four children, three boys and one girl, all of which were living at her death. She left twin boys seven hours old, one of which died six weeks later.

Melvina Tucker, daughter of Eli and Elizabeth Blevins, was born May 20, 1855 in Washington county, Va. and died March 18, 1917 in Ashe county N. C., age 61 years, 9 months and 28 days.

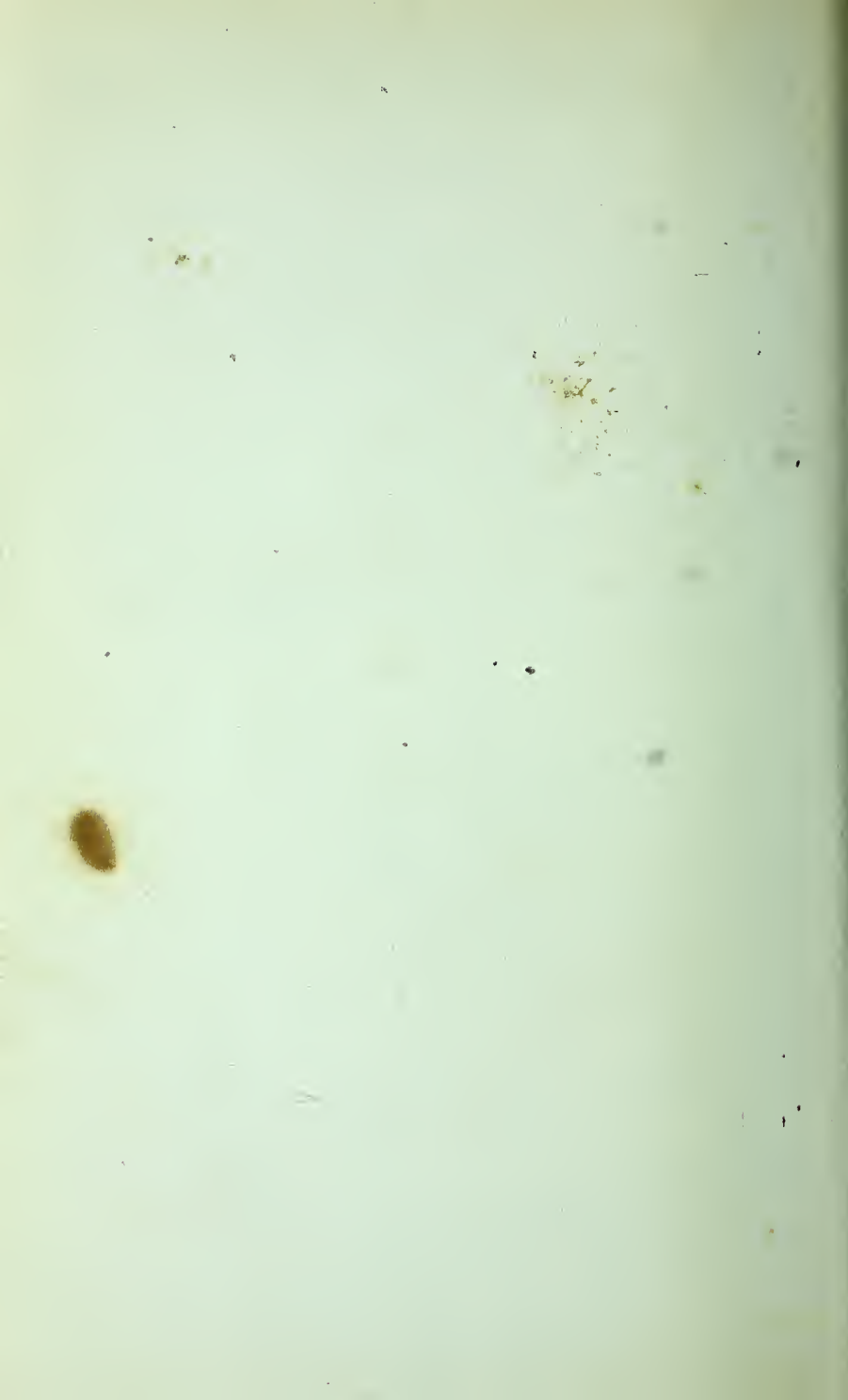

**CONSTITUTION**

Art. 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the Association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6. The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing, and distributing to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

7. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee or five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10. The Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session on the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not receive nor retain in permanent fellowship any Church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage,

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session,

---

### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.
2. We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testament, is the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.
3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
4. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ
5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order
6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that only those who are thus baptised and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.
7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to Glory.
8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.
9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

---

### RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator and not proceed till he is recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.
5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.
6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house, or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking.

BRO. Romulus Pettigrew Witherspoon, was born Jan. 30, 1876, died Dec. 11, 1918. Age 42 years, 10 months and 19 days. A wife, and four children (a boy and three girls) father, two brothers and six sisters survive him. His father was a Confederate Soldier and served through the war and was twice wounded.

He married Miss Ella Burkett, the daughter of C. B. Burkett, April 27 1902. Was brought up a Methodist, and joined the Methodist Church at Orion in 1901. In 1905 he joined the Friendship Missionary Baptist Church and remained a member in good standing. He was one of the most active leading members of Friendship Church, and the best payer to the cause among all the members. He was ordained Deacon in 1916. Rarely failed to be at his post of duty. Was usually elected a delegate to the Association.

He was a prosperous, upright citizen, leaving his finances in good shape. Was a Free Mason in good standing, being initiated into that order in 1900 Served in the highest office of his Lodge, being Worshipful Master for 3 years. In his death his wife lost one of the best of husbands, th children one of the best of fathers, the neighborhood, County and State, one of best of citizens. He was a public spirited citizen and never hesitated in supporting all measures that were a benefit to the public..

Bro. Lenzo Bare, son of Newton and Ann Bare, was born Aug. 3, 1888, and died Dec. 6, 1918, age 30 years, 4 months and 3 days. He had an attack of Grippe, followed later by Pneumonia, which killed him. He married Miss Bessie Liddle in Dec. 1913. There were born to them 3 children, two of whom are living. His family have lost a loving husband and father, and the church a faithful member, and the country a good citizen. He professed religion and joined the Glendale Baptist Church in 1914, and lived a devoted member. Was elected and ordained Deacon of th church. Later he moved near Obids Church and consequently moved his membership to Obids Church.

In his death his loved ones and friends have an unmeasured loss. He has crossed the river of death to join the brother and sister who have preceeded him, and are waiting till all meet again.

A precious one from us is gone,  
 A voice we loved is still,  
 A place is vacant in our home,  
 Which can never be filled  
 Rest in peaceful slumber,  
 Dearest brother, husband and son,  
 When our pilgrimage on earth is o're  
 We shall join you in that celestial city above.

His body was laid to rest in Obids Church Cemetary near his brothr and little daughtr. His little daughter, Josiphene, who was about three years old, died of the same that killed hr father.

Bro. Daniel Burkett, was perhaps the oldest, or at least one of the oldest men in the County at his death. He was born Nov. 26, 1818, and died July 17, 1919 at the age of 100 years, 7 months, and 16 days. He was a farmer all his life, was born and died in the same residence, near West Jefferson, N. C. He was married to Miss Nancy Johnston, Dec. 11, 1847, and settled in the wild woods something over a mile below his father's place at what is now known as the Smithdeal place, living there 13 years and then moved back to the old homestead, where he spent the remainder of his long life. His wife died in 1876. He lived the remainder of his, being 43 years, a widower. When a young man the panther, bear, wildcat, raccoon and the beautiful wild turkey roamed the mountains, hills and valleys of Ashe County, he was not a hunter, but at one time killed a wild deer with a rock, finding it where dogs had chased it into a swamp near the road.

His grandfather was Dutch, or in other words a Hollander, the country where the once proud, haughty Kaiser, is now billeted. He came in to this country and settled the Calvin Graybeal place awhile after the Revolutionary War, he raised a very large family.

David Burkett, the father of Daniel, died while Daniel was a small child leaving a young widow who survived him over 60 years, remaining a widow. Bro. Daniel had one brother and no sister. He was raised to talk nothing but Dutch till 11 years old. When a young man he was not healthy and strong.

He professed religion and joined the old Primitive Baptist Church, which stood near Jefferson, remaining a member of that church till it went down. When the Missionary Baptist Church was organized he went in as a charter member, and remained a member in good standing. He was a Deacon of the Jefferson Missionary Baptist Church for many years before his death, and attended the church regular as long as he was able. For 11 years previous to his death was never able to stand on his feet.

He was a Whig in politics till the party went down, then swang into the Democratic party. Cast his first presidential vote for William Henry Harrison, for President and his last Presidential vote for President Wilson, never missing but one Presidential vote in all those long years. He was the father of 11 children, of whom six are now living, has 97 descendants living, and lived to see his fifth generation.

Mary Susanna Clary was born June 8, 1845, died Aug. 27, 1919, age 69 years 2 months and 19 days. Married J. A. Johuson, Jan. 4, 1866. Professed religion and joined the Baptist Church, Jan. 4, 1860.

Sidney Tucker was born in Grayson County Va. March 13, 1849, and died March 13, 1919, age 70 years. Was married to Melvina Blevins, March 9, 1875. He professed religion and joined Apple Grove Missionary Baptist Church in Feb. 1877 and lived a devoted member, missing very few of his church meetings in all his 42 years membership.

Willie H. Sheets, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Horton Shets, was born in Ashe County, N. C. March 31, 1895, and was killed on the battle field in France, Aug. 4, 1918. Age 23 years, 4 months and four days. He answered the call for defense and upon a foreign soil across the sea, many thousands of miles from all loved ones to extend a loving hand, there he gave his life that the world might enjoy the liberty of our fathers.

He joined the Missionary Baptist Church at Zion Hill, Feb. 10, 1910; and lived a consistent member.

Roscoe Isham Thompson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Isham Thompson, of Grassy Creek, N. C. was born April 9, 1894.

He was called into the service of his country and taken to France, while crossing the Atlantic Ocean in Sept. 1918, he accepted Christ Jesus as his Savior and wrote the good news to his parents at home.

After landing at St. Nazaire, France, he was stricken with pneumonia and died in November 1918, being 24 years, 7 months and 20 days old. He is survived by his wife (Bertha M. Deboard) Thompson, one son, Joseph Roscoe, father, mother, three brothers and two sisters.

## CONSTITUTION

Art. 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected moderator, clerk and treasurer in such way as the Association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6. The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches the proceedings of the body.

7. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee or five brethren, who shall look after the destitute within the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10. The Association shall convene annually on Tuesday after the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session in the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest, Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any Church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

**ABSTRACTS OF PRINCIPLES**

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.
2. We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testament, is the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.
3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
4. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their constituted order.
6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.
7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to Glory.
8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.
9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

**RULES OF ORDER**

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.

The Orphanage rests heavily on the hearts our people. More than 525 boys and girls are growing into honorable manhood and womanhood under its benign influence. Its record is rich in helpful service; our people are satisfied.

We feel more keenly with each passing year our obligation to the children who cry to us for help and friendship. And as this obligation is more clearly seen and felt, we the more gladly and generously discharge it.

And this is well, for the enormous and outrageous price that we are obliged to pay for every household necessity makes it necessary to increase the current fund in order to keep our beloved Institution out of bondage and peril of debt.

Furthermore the pressure for admittance from boys and girls on the outside grows stronger day by day. Hundreds of homeless children utterly helpless and dependent clamor at the doors. The Lord has poured material things upon us. Our barns are filled with plenty and our presses burst out with new wine. We are well able to heed the cry of these children, and we must heed it or suffer ourselves.

To give relief to this army of needy children we must largely increase our current funds. What comes into the treasury barely covers the cost of supporting those within the Walls of the Orphanage.

We have many children here who might be cared for by their mothers, if a little help were supplied to them by the communities from which they come. The welfare workers of the State, with Mr Roland F. Beasty at their heads are trying to hold these households intact. We would give our hearty endorsement to this agency of help and blessing then make more room in the Orphanage for those who have neither mother nor father but are wholly dependent upon the institution for this care and training.

Your committee would recommend:

- (1) The plan for setting apart one day for the orphanage at or near Thanksgiving by every man, woman and child in this association.
- (2) A monthly contribution from every Sunday School in this Association.
- (3) A club of Chairty and Children in the well organized Sunday Schools with an individual copy as many others as possible.

### *CONSTITUTION*

---

Art. 1. This body shall be called The Ashe Association.

2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer, in such way as the Association may direct. The two last offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.

6. The clerk shall keep correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

7. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10. The Association shall convene annually on Thursday before the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on

the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any Church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

### *ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES*

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2. We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their Scriptural order.

6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.

7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory

8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal

### *RULES OF ORDER*

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.



5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while the Moderator is speaking

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has 417 missionaries under appointment from America, not including a great number of native preachers and workers.

The Board has on the Foreign Field 49,659 church members, 554 churches, 11,148 outstations, 155 churches are self supporting.

Since the 75-Million Campaign was projected, we have sent out 104 missionaries and others are under appointment.

We have 10 theological schools with 345 students enrolled; and 554 schools including colleges and schools of lower grades, 18,169 students enrolled.

We have 16 hospital buildings and 14 dispensaries.

We have 6 publishing houses and 7 denominational papers on the foreign fields.

The 417 missionaries are distributed as follows: China 121; Africa 24; Italy 2; Brazil 112; Mexico 12; Japan 20; Argentina 19; Chile 7.

The Foreign Mission Board has lately accepted responsibility for work in Spain, Jugoslavia, Roumania, Southern Russia, Siberia, Palestine and Asyria.

These fields are being organized for great evangelistic campaigns and for the training of Christian workers.

To take care of the missionaries on the field, maintain the work already in operation, and to enter new doors of opportunity which swing on their hinges every day, needs money. The needs greatly

#### ORPHANAGE.

The thirty fifth annual report of the orphanage is now given to us and still the orphanage is as dear to us as when it was first founded.

The present number number in the orphanage is five hundred thirty one—two hundred forty one boys and two hundred ninety girls, eighty five of these are at Kennedy Home. Twenty one are aided by their mothers, some are taking Caswell Training, some taking nursing and five have entered high school.

More than ever should we now feel our obligation to the many children crying to us for help and friendship. There were 724 applications to the orphanage this year and only sixty three received.

There have been many improvements made in the Orphanage this year, which call for more funds, and the financial and industrial condition through which we are passing have been hard on the Orphanage. The current funds of this year are short of last year, seven thousand dollars.

Each passing year demonstrates the wisdom of monthly collections in our churches and Sunday schools for the Orphanage.

The home has lost a good father, and the church a good member, by his death. Our loss is his eternal gain.

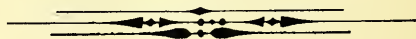
David Welch, son of Owen Welch, was born June 20, 1889; died June 24, 1918, age 29 years and 4 days.

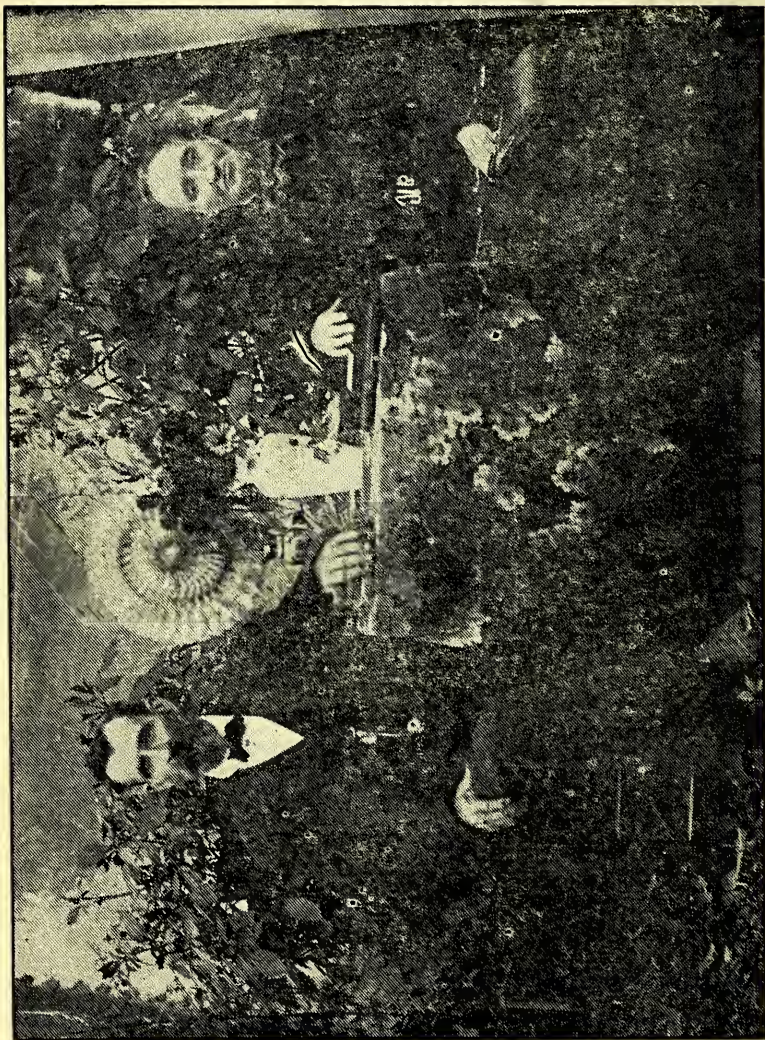

## CONSTITUTION

- Art. 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.
2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.
3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment, and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.
4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer, in such way as the association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.
5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such other duties as are required of presiding officers.
6. The clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.
7. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.
8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.
9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.
10. The Association shall convene annually on Thursday before the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Or-

phanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed

12. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any Church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sell, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

#### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1. We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2. We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their Scriptural order.

6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.

7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

#### RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is fundamental to civilization. Knowledge is the dynamic of progress. Thought is the forerunner of action. We should thank God for our system of Baptist Education. But should we be thankful for Christian Education as a theory, or as a practical asset to our denomination? ### HOME MISSIONS

The larger things made possible for Home Missions by the 75-million campaign can probably be best suggested in Secretary B. D. Gray's announcement that the Home Mission Board received in money during the first year of the campaign nearly three times as much as the yearly average for the five years preceeding the launching of this forward movement.

The Home Board receipts from May 1st 1919, to May 1st 1921, have been 3,201,486 85. This amount has made possible larger results on the home fields.

During the last two years from May 1st 1919, to May 1st 1921, there has been a total of 77,377 additions to the membership of local Baptist churches of the South—a gain over 1918 of more than 20,000. Of this number of additions, 45,092 came by baptism.

For the last year the Home Board was able to report the enlisting of 4,087 young people in some definite form of Christian service.

The number of Missionaries employed by the Board was increased to 1,656. The number of new churches constituted by them was 258.

The number of church buildings built or improved 524, and the number of Sunday schools organized 835.

This is only a brief summary of some of the things that are being accomplished by the Home Board.

There is yet a greater work to do. Other fields to be explored that haven't yet been opened. The opening up of those fields depends greatly upon the churches of the south. Then realizing as we do the urgent need, we want to urge the brethren and sisters who pledged to the 75 Million fund, to pay your pledges and ask others who have not yet given any thing to make a contribution to this great cause, as the Lord has prospered them.

### ORPHANAGE

With each passing year we feel more keenly our obligation to the children who cry to us for help and friendship. And as this obligation is more clearly seen and felt we are gradually providing more and better room.

The Thomasville Orphanage has in its care the largest group of children of any other organized body in the state. Counting the 105 children aided in their own homes we are caring for 647 boys and girls that are now growing into promising manhood and womanhood. More than 2100 have received this most helpful service and it is ever the aim of our management to make them happier, healthier and wiser and purer in spirit. It is a training institution that builds character, dignifies labor and trains for life.

Our health record has been so good that we scarcely think of the sickness side of it at all. One of our fine boys, Thurman McDaniel, was killed in February almost instantly by being thrown from a mule.

Our dairy herd at Thomasville and the Kennedy Home are gradually being improved. Several cows have given as much as ten gallons per day and every child has an average of over a quart of milk per day. Our supply of home made bacon is the best in our history, saving us the necessity of buying any during the year. The farm and dairy at the Kennedy Home made a small profit. The printing department made a profit of \$4,682.99, all of which went into the general treasury to help support the children.

One of our greatest fields of enlargement is Mother's Aid. We are now helping more than 100 children with their mothers at about one third of the cost of keeping them in the Orphanage. This work is appealing more and more to the popular mind as it not only keeps the child with his own mother but is much more economical.

At the recent meeting of the Board of Trustees they threw out a challenge to individuals and associations for three more dormitories so that we may take more children that are clamoring for admittance. There were 611 applications turned away last year on account of lack of room. To give relief to this great throng of children we must largely increase our Current Fund. What comes into the treasury is barely enough to take care of the Orphanage.

Your committee would again recommend:

1. A monthly contribution from every Sunday School in this Asso.



2. The plan of setting apart ONE DAY FOR THE ORPHAN-AGE at or near Thanksgiving by every man, woman and child in this association.

3. A club of Charity & Children in the well organized Sunday Schools with an individual copy to as many others as possible.

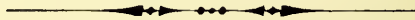
#### SARAH BLEVINS

## CONSTITUTION

Art 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a moderator, clerk and treasurer, in such way as the association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

6. The clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

7. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold a annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren, who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10. The Association shall convene annually on Thursday before the first Sunday in September. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any Church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

- 1 We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost and that these three are one.
- 2 We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testaments, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.
- 3 We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.
- 4 We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
- 5 We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.
- 6 We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.
- 7 We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.
- 8 We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.
- 9 We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

## RULES OF ORDER

- 1 Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2 When the Moderator calls the house to order every member shall at once take his seat.
- 3 When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.
- 4 No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.
- 5 No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.
- 6 It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Without criticizing the former excellent reports on Sunday Schools, or by inference reflecting upon them, your committee has decided to take another tack, and instead of adding to the words of wisdom emphasizing the value of the Sunday School to the church which grace the old minutes, give some figures that to our minds speak louder than any words of ours can speak. These figures are taken from our last minutes.

The expenses of all the Sunday Schools in Ashe County as reported a year ago amounted to \$236.69 annually. That is the members of Baptist Churches in Ashe County contribute less than ten cents per member to the support of Sunday School work.

Nine of our forty five Baptist Churches reported no Sunday School whatever, a twenty per cent deficiency.

Out of our 2356 members of Baptist Churches in Ashe County, only



524 were reported enrolled in Sunday Schools; and this 524 is the number that is enrolled in Sunday School, which of course includes more than can be counted as regular attendants. About one in four of the white population of North Carolina is enrolled in all the Sunday Schools of the State. Ashe County Baptists make a worse showing than this sorry porportion as less than one in four of our own church members are enrolled in our Sunday Schools.

The average number of teachers reported for Sunday Schools of the county is three.

About six Sunday Schools in the county report that they are open all the year.

Between the lines of these figures, your committee reads: That there are too few clases, that little effort has been made to grade the Sunday Schools, and that practically no equipment for teaching except a scanty amount of literature is provided. That the adult church members are largely uninterested and that only a part of the younger members of our churches are enrolled in Sunday School. That our pastors do not take the same interest, (there are some shining exceptions, thank God!) in the Sunday Schools that they do in the regular church services.

Your committee would set as a goal for Ashe County Baptists:

1. A Sunday School in every church, open the year round.
2. One hundred per cent., resident church membership enrolled.
3. Increase contributions to provide sufficient literature and equipment.
4. Organized and graded Sunday Schools, with at least five classes, and more where practicable.
5. A County wide or Association wide effort to provide teacher training for our Sunday School teachers.
6. The selection of officers and teachers of irreproachable Christian character.

Shakespeare says, "If to do were as easy as to know what were well to do, then chapels had been churches and poor men's hovels princes palaces." We have set a high standard which we can not reach at a single flight. But we can work with our ideals among the stars and climb higher than if we are satisfied with the shabby showing our last minute disclosed. "A man's reach should exceed his grasp or what's a Heaven for "

This is a worthy program, and if carried out would double the efficiency of our churches and mightily please our Lord Jesus, who spent his Sabbath days teaching the scriptures in the synagogues of Capernaum and Galilee.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Christian Education is the training of the young men and women of our country in the principles of orthodox Christianity, the ideals of Christian living and genuine stability in the doctrine of Christ and his holy writ.

We Baptist of this Association cannot unduly emphasize a strict adherence to this definition. We only have to turn around and look the world in the face and the menace of what the materialistic education is. It is a blow against the new dispensation of Christ, an attempt to destroy the very principles of Christian ideals, and our faith and doctrine of the Bible.

Our educational institutions in the state and the entire South have kept pace during the past year with the general line of advancement. The pressure for more Christian controlled schools, however, is keenly felt. More Baptist high schools are needed, and our colleges are having to turn eager and worthy boys and girls away because of inadequate equipment and buildings.

Christian education is closer to our churches and Sunday Schools than it has been in the past. Trained leaders and preachers are with us, but the demand is greater yet than the supply. We must strive to get strong Christian trained men and women in the field or lose in the fight against sin. With the harvest great and the cry heard for educated leaders, let's encourage and promote this phase of our work as never before.

Christian Education Day has become a real factor in creating a conscience on Christian Education. It is hoped that this day will bring to pastors and Sunday School superintendents the importance of its true worth, and that they will make its significance worth while by willingly and eagerly participating in it.

Our people as a denomination should see to it that their children read literature of the highest religious and cultural order. We feel that the parents will be responsible to God for the class of literature given their children to read, determine their lives and seal their destinies.

## REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our Foreign Mission work grows. We have 891 churches in sixteen foreign lands; 211 or practically one-fourth of these churches are self-supporting; 442 or one-half have their own houses of worship. In addition to the churches there are 2,896 out-stations which give us a total of practically 4,000 stations where the word of God is preached regularly. Last year was the crowning year in baptism, 12,611 were baptized, which is 4,720 more than reported the year before. We have passed the 100,000 mark in membership. We have 103,328 members. These gave \$4.23 per capita last year. We have 796 schools which were attended last year by 32,789 scholars. This is about equal to the number of students in our Baptist schools in the southland. Of course all of our schools in foreign lands are not of equal grade to those in the South, but we have our students in these foreign lands under our tutelage quite as long as we have the students in our Southern schools.

There were 1447 Sunday School, which had an enrollment of 67,407.

We have now 501 foreign missionaries and 2,820 native missionaries. This is almost twice as many foreign missionaries and almost four times as many native missionaries as we had in 1919 at the beginning of the 75 Million Campaign.

The Board reported a debt of \$403,000 at the last Southern Baptist Convention. There has been no disposition to criticize the Board because everybody has realized that the Board has been very conservative in making appropriations. It has appropriated only a little above one half of the amount that was proposed for it in the 75 Million Campaign. The Convention was very serious about the situation, and was anxious to do something to set this great Board forward in its wonderful work.

After hearing of the Board's financial condition and of the more than fifty young people who were ready to be sent out to the foreign fields this year, the convention passed a most remarkable endorsement of the Board by raising through voluntary subscriptions from delegates present enough money to send out these new missionaries. That was a practical endorsement. It took place in one of the most spiritual hours of the Southern Baptist Convention ever experienced. The story of that Friday night's session of the Convention has carried inspiration not only to great numbers of churches in the homeland but has enheartened the missionaries on every foreign field.

In the spirit of what took place at the Southern Baptist Convention the Board at its June meeting appointed forty-eight new missionaries who in the early fall of this year will go to their fields.

The practical suggestion for everybody to take to heart at this critical time when the Board is burdened with debt, overwhelmed by the growth of the work, and appalled by the vast needs, is that every one should do his utmost to pay his 75 Million Campaign pledge in full this year. If these pledges are paid fully, the Board can pay its debts, support the missionaries and provide for many many more distressing needs. The simple solution of our present situation is the payment of our 75 Million Campaign pledges. This is the biggest need for Foreign Missions this year. Now is the time to go forward.

## Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, in such way as the association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The Moderator shall preside at the meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10. The Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

13. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

---

### **Abstract of Principles**

1 We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2. We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testaments, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God

4 We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

### **Rules of Order**

1 Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2 When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3 When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.

4 No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5 No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6 It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

**P-R-O-C-E-E-D-I-N-G-S**

Tuckerdale, N. C.

Friday, Aug. 29, 1924.

The Ashe Missionary Baptist Association met in its 38th Annual Session with Tuckerdale Missionary Baptist Church August 29, 1924. The Introductory sermon was delivered by Rev. T. M. Hayes. Text Ephesians, 3rd chapter, 18 verse. Subject, "That ye may know the breadth, length, depth and height of God's love."

2. Election of officers. Upon motion of Rev. T. M. Hayes, and seconded by E. L. Tucker, Prof. J. C. Goodman and W. C. Johnston were re-elected by acclamation as Moderator and Clerk, respectively of the Ashe Association.

3. Roll call of churches. 31 church letters were handed in.

4. Call for new churches. A letter of application from Baptist Chapel, asking restoration into the Ashe Association by recommendation. The recommendations were furnished by ministers and members of the churches of the Ashe Association. Following is the letter of application:

"The Baptist Chapel Church, to the Ashe Association:

Greetings:

"We, the Baptist Chapel Church, do ask for admission into your body. This church was organized as a missionary Baptist church about eighty-two years ago, but changed her membership from the New River Association to the Mountain Union Association, and now having decided, for reasons not mentioned, to again affiliate ourselves with you, and to help carry forward the great Missionary cause, we ask for admission into your body by recommendation.

We refer you to Rev. W. F. Barker, J. C. Jones and W. L. Hurley of the Landmark Baptist Church, Rev. Estle Eller, W. M. Lovelace, Cicero Deboard of the Pleasant Home Baptist Church, and to Rev. W. F. Denney, our pastor, for recommendation.

"Respectfully submitted,

"Baptist Chapel Church."

5. By motion the Baptist Chapel Church was received into the Ashe Missionary Baptist Association. The vote was unanimous for the reception of this church.

6. By request of brother James Eller, presented to the association by Rev. H. W. Baucom of Winston-Salem, a prayer was offered in behalf of Mrs. Eller who was seriously ill. The prayer was led by Rev. J. R. Shoemate. After prayer the association was adjourned for one hour.

### Friday Afternoon Session, 1:30 P. M.

1. The afternoon session was opened by singing, followed by prayer, led by Rev. J. F. Fletcher of Raleigh, N. C.
2. The invitation to visitors was extended and the following were seated with the association: Rev. H. W. Baucom and I. G. Sisk of Pilot Mountain Association; Rev. S. F. Morton of Yadkin and Surry Association; Rev. J. F. Fletcher of Central Association; Rev. S. Blevins and Rev. J. R. Dolinger of Lebanon Association; Rev. R. S. Whittington of Brushy Mountain Association; Revs. C. L. Stikes, G. M. Reuning and J. R. Sumate of New River Association.
3. Reading of Abstract of Principles and Rules of Order.
4. Standing committees were called and all were found ready to report, save the committee on Obituaries, they not being present.
5. By unanimous consent of the association the present Executive Committee were retained for another year.
6. The delegates of the Tuckerdale Church, together with Rev. Coy S. Blackburn were appointed as Committee on Religious Exercises during this session of the association.
7. Ira T. Johnston, R. F. Gentry and J. F. Fletcher were chosen as Committee on Resolutions.
8. George Hopkins was appointed to submit a report on Temperance.
9. G. S. Holman, W. C. Trivett, F. N. Stevens, W. H. Tyree, G. B. Doggette, George Hopkins, H. C. Tucker and J. W. Huffman were appointed to select Place and Preacher for the next annual session of the association. Three churches asked for the association, Laurel Knob, Peak Valley, West Jefferson.
10. Rev. H. W. Baucom was appointed to submit a report on the Baptist Hospital of Winston-Salem. Rev. Baucom read a report sent out by the Baptist State Board and suggested that the same be included in the minutes of the association.

#### BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The North Carolina Baptist Hospital begins its second year of ministry under most favorable conditions. The first year exceeded our highest expectations in the number of patients, in the amount of charity work, and the extent of the influence and blessings of our great Home of Healing. 1400 patients were treated, nearly 200 charity patients came to us from every quarter of the state. With joy we received these and gave them our best. It may be said that all were not cured. Some were unimproved. Some came and we had to say that we could not do them any good. Some went away disappointed because we could not cure them of their troubles. Our physicians

fail some times to diagnose the case, as do all other physicians. Some came to late. Some had incurable troubles. But after all this has been said, the record of our work for healing those who came has been wonderful. Surely the good Lord has guided the mind and the hand of the physician who has treated these sick and suffering ones from many places in our state. The percentage of cures has been unusual, and for this we rejoice. We believe prayer contributed no little to the result of our efforts. For the last two months our earnings have equalled our expenditures,—a fact that is far beyond the expectations of our Board. The prophesy was that this would not be reached in two years. The second year began with the hospital full of patients as far as we are open. We have 86 available beds,—the fifth floor is still being used for graduate nurses because we have no Nurses' Home. We are expecting to increase the number of patients at least 50% this year. The second class of pupil nurses has been organized and are at work. Now we have 22 pupil nurses. After this year these will largely substitute the number of graduate nurses necessary to run the Hospital and this will greatly cut our expenses. These girls are all Christians and are willing, courteous, pleasant and earnest. They are in the profession for a high purpose and they give the patients their best. They love the cause, and service is their motto.

The grounds have been beautified by a splendid coat of grass, shrubbery and trees. We have increased our field of endeavor and added to our efficiency and equipment during the past months.

#### NEEDS

We have many urgent needs at this time. We need money to carry on our charity work. Mothers' Day Offering amounted to \$10,000 which did not pay the indebtedness for supplies and the expenses of opening. This left us with a debt for all charity work already done and facing the necessity of borrowing every cent for charity for the next twelve months. We are urging churches to make contributions in the Sunday School to help raise money to help pay the expenses for the patients they send so we may be able to care for them. Our charity work averages about \$750 per month. If the churches will raise about half the expenses of those they send we will be able to meet all demands. Otherwise we must turn many away.

We need a Nurses' Home. We are deprived of 18 of our best beds because we must keep these nurses on our fifth floor. We ought to build this home.

We need radium. Many have cancers and other malignant diseases who cannot be cured without radium. \$10,000 will buy us an

ample supply. Some good brother who loves the Lord and suffering humanity ought to give us this and bless our people for the next three thousand years.

We thank God for the progress. We thank our people for their support. We pray for your interest and co-operation. Come to us, send your friends to us and tell others about our hospital.

11. Rev. S. F. Morton discussed the work of the Baptist Hospital and its importance to the Baptist cause in North Carolina.

13. Report on Christian Education was delivered by Rev. J. S. Hopkins, followed by a talk on the importance of B. Y. P. U. work as one means of Christian Education, the importance of Church Schools, such as Oak Hill, Mountain View and others, toward the development of the younger folks of today and the importance of teaching the Holy Bible in the home. Several took part in the discussion, among them were Rev. J. S. Hopkins, Dell Goodman, Rev. T. M. Hayes, Rev. J. F. Fletcher and others.

#### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is one of the most, if not the most, vital factors in the promulgation of Christ's message to the world. Christian training is the backbone of Christian activities. But a brief survey of the workings of the churches of the Ashe Association leads us to the conclusion that probably this is the most neglected phase of our work. The challenge has never been greater nor the call more intense than now for Ashe county Baptists to put forth their supreme efforts in the training of their youth. The demand has never been greater for trained leaders in our churches. Ignorance has long been our most bitter enemy, and unless this foe is captured, we can never expect progressive churches.

Realizing the great importance of Christian Education and the great need for trained men and women to carry on the work of Jesus Christ, your committee offer the the following suggestions:

1. That the parents be more diligent in the teaching of the Bible



in the homes. Fathers and mothers are shamefully neglecting their children in this particular way. Our Bibles are covered with dust while the boys and girls go ignorant of God's teachings and become irreverent toward all holy things. In the home is the place to inculcate in the child the sacred truths, "and when he is old he will not depart from it."

2. That the importance of Sunday Schools be stressed more. Too great emphasis cannot be placed here. The universality of the S.S. makes it one of the greatest factors in Christian education; therefore every possible effort should be put forth to make our Sunday-schools the very best.

3. That more attention be given to the training of the young people. Of all the organizations in the Baptist churches, the B.Y.P.U. has been the most neglected in the Ashe Association. It is a tragic scene to see the talented young men and women in this association that do not have an opportunity to train themselves in Christian work. The B.Y.P.U. is the training camp of the Baptist church, and if the church doesn't have a B.Y.P.U., she has no reserves in training. Unless the Baptist young people receive this training from the hands of our churches, they are being robbed of that which does rightly belong to them.

4. That we insist upon the teachers of our public schools being men and women of strong Christian character.

5. That we give undivided support to our denominational schools. In the denominational schools, training in orthodoxy is unparalleled. It, therefore, behooves every Baptist parent to make sacrifices that his boys and girls may share the benefits of these noble institutions. Respectfully submitted.

#### REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER

Ashe Association, Baptist Church, Tuckerdale, N. C.,

This is an age of information. People are reading more than ever before in the history of the world. This is especially true in Ashe County and Northwest North Carolina. Daily motor mail service has meant a daily paper in hundreds of homes west of the Blue Ridge on the day of publication. Our people have had their horizon widened and the gateways to the great outside world opened as never before. All this is well. Ashe County Baptists welcome the new era and pray for greater progress.

However, every progressive movement in other realms of thought and action and material development within our borders imposes new obligations upon us who uphold the banner of the Baptist Church and of King Immanuel. If our growth is mental, moral, and spiritual as well as physical, our information must be of the right sort, our reading must be of the right sort. And unless we desire a lop-sided development, we certainly must not neglect reading religious literature. First of all, we should dust off our family Bibles and commune with the master minds who, we believe, held communion as they wrote with the Divine. Next, we should plan for ourselves and our children to receive reading matter as varied as we wish our lives to be; and our denominational paper will assuredly have a place in any well-chosen list.

Baptists in North Carolina are particularly fortunate in having the Biblical Recorder, a publication that in arrangement and subject matter compares favorably with the secular and religious papers of the country. It has departments which are of interest to every member of the family. Its readers are informed by its pages of the activities of the denomination as they can be in no other way.

What would you think of a physician who has no medical books in his library and does not read of any of the new developments in realm of medical science? What would you think of a lawyer who has no law books and court reports in his library and who has no method of keeping up with happenings in the legal world? What would you think of a Christian who is ignorant of the great Text-book of the Christian, the Bible?

And what would you think of a Baptist who for the pittance of \$2.00 per year debars himself and his family of the wealth of information and inspiration to be found in his state denominational paper, the Biblical Recorder?

Let's give it 100% subscription list in Ashe Association. It will help the paper, and it will help the Baptist cause in Ashe county immeasurably more.

This com. to report at the next annual session of the association. Committee appointed: C. W. Phillips, J. C. Green, W. T. Harless, J. W. Barr, and J. F. Dillard.

17. List of homes where delegates were to spend the night were read.

18. By motion the meeting was adjourned until 9 a. m. Saturday morning. Dell Goodman announced the Benediction.

### Saturday Morning Session

1. The Association met according to adjournment. One half hour was spent in devotional exercises conducted by Rev. E. E. Blevins.

2. By motion it was ordered that the body discuss prohibition, or law enforcement without a written report. The discussion was carried on by David Harless, Rev. T. M. Hayes, Rev. J. R. Sumate and others.

3. Upon the call for letters from churches absent during the Friday Session, none responded.

4. The Moderator appointed the following as a finance committee: Rev. J. S. Hopkins, C. W. Phillips, and J. P. Howell

5. Report on Pastoral Support was submitted by G. B. Doggette. The report was discussed by G. B. Doggett, Ira T. Johnston, Rev. J. F. Fletcher and others.

#### PASTORAL SUPPORT

In the 10th chapter of St. Luke's Gospel, we read that Jesus sent forth seventy of his disciples into every city and place whither He himself would come.

He commanded them to make no material provision for their journey, stating plainly in the last part of the 7th verse that the laborer is worthy of his hire.

Then again in the 9th chapter of first Corinthians and the 14th v., we hear St. Paul saying, "Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the gospel should live of the gospel."

And so, if Jesus Christ ordained that ministers of the gospel be supported by those to whom they preach, then it becomes the scriptural duty of every Christian to aid in supporting his or her pastor.

Your committee urges that the churches of the Ashe Association form themselves into groups or fields and call full time pastors for such groups or fields as may be formed, and pay them living salaries so that they may be able to do efficient preaching and work for their churches. Your committee believes in paying the pastor a living salary in reasonable proportion to the salaries paid to other laborers.

It is true the ministers of the gospel have great assurance of rich rewards in heaven, but this assurance does not satisfy temporal needs. Brethren, pay your pastor.

6. Congressman Robt. L. Doughton of the Alleghany Association was seated with the body and made a short address on the importance of church work.

7. The call for discussion of the 75-Million Campaign was well answered. Rev. H. W. Baucom of Winston-Salem opened the discussion, urging the Baptists of Ashe County to go over the top with their pledges.

8. By motion it was ordered to go on record that the Ashe Association start with a new determination to complete the 75-Million Campaign.

9. By motion it was ordered that a committee be appointed to solicit funds for the 1925 program.

10. By motion the association was adjourned for one hour. The benediction was announced by Rev. J. R. Shumate.

### **Saturday Afternoon Session**

1. Session opened by song and prayer. The prayer was led by Rev. John Anderson.

2. The committee on Sunday Schools reported that they chose to adopt the report submitted by the committee last year. The Report was read from the minutes by the clerk.

#### **SUNDAY SCHOOLS**

(Report of last year.)

Without criticizing the former excellent reports on Sunday-schools, or by inference reflecting upon them, your committee has decided to take another tack, and instead of adding to the words of wisdom emphasizing the value of the Sunday-school to the church which grace the old minutes, give some figures that to our minds speak louder than any words of ours can speak. These figures are taken from our last minutes.

The expenses of all the Sunday-schools in Ashe County as reported a year ago amounted to \$236.69 annually. That is the members of Baptist Churches in Ashe County contribute less than ten cents per member to the Sunday-school work.

Nine of our forty five Baptist Churches reported no Sunday-school whatever, a twenty per cent deficiency.

Out of our 2356 members of Baptist Churches in Ashe County, only 524 were reported enrolled in Sunday-schools; and this 524 is the number that is enrolled in Sunday-school, which of course includes more than can be counted as regular attendants. About one in four of the white population of North Carolina is enrolled in all the Sunday-schools of the state. Ashe County Baptists make a worse showing than this sorry porportion as less than one in four of our own

church members are enrolled in our Sunday schools.

The average number of teachers reported for Sunday schools of the county is three.

About six Sunday schools in the county report that they are open all the year.

Between the lines of these figures, your committee reads: That there are too few classes, that little effort has been made to grade the Sunday schools, and that practically no equipment for teaching, except a small amount of literature, is provided. That the adult church members are largely uninterested and that only a part of the younger members of our churches are enrolled in Sunday-school. That our pastors do not take the same interest, (there are some shining exceptions, thank God!) in the Sunday-schools that they do in regular church services.

Your committee would set as a goal for Ashe County Baptists:

1. A Sunday-school in every church, open the year round.
2. One hundred per cent. resident church membership enrolled.
3. Increase contributions to provide sufficient literature and equipment.
4. Organized and graded Sunday-schools, with at least five classes and more where practicable.
5. A County wide or Association wide effort to provide teacher training for our Sunday-school teachers.
6. The selection of officers and teachers of irreproachable Christian character.

Shakespeare says, "If to do were as easy as to know what were well to do, then chapels had been churches and poor men's hovels princes palaces." We have set a high standard which we cannot reach at a single flight. But we can work with our ideals among the stars and climb higher than if we are satisfied with the shabby showing our last minute disclosed. "A man's reach should exceed his grasp or what's a Heaven for?"

This is a worthy program, and if carried out would double the efficiency of our churches and mightily please our Lord Jesus, who spent His Sabbath days teaching the Scriptures in the synagogues of Capernaum and Galilee.

the Ashe Association, report the organization of 16 Sunday-schools, four of which held evergreen Sunday-schools.

4. Time for the closing of business of association drawing near, the following reports were ordered entered in the minutes without being read to the Association: Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, and Baptist Orphanage.

#### HOME MISSIONS

We are deeply concerned about all the phases of our mission work; Foreign, Home and State, but it seems that there are some who are unwilling to join heartily in Mission work. There are those who are opposed to any form of missions, but the host of God-fearing and liberty-loving Baptists are marching on to Zion through our Mission Boards.

Home Missions embrace work for the Master in the Southland. Our Board at Atlanta, Georgia, is the agency through which our Baptist forces combine their resources and their energies to make desert places to garden into veritable gardens of the Lord in the countryside and the growing towns and cities in the newer sections of our country. The activities are so many that we can only write briefly of each.

Co-operative Missions— This is one of our five departments. In co-operation with mission work in each State we are able to do effective work. The sum of about \$175,000 is used in this work.

Evangelism and Enlistment— Results in this two years ago justified their consideration. There are 80 workers. During the past year we spent \$150,000. From the field 15,000 conversions are reported.

Foreigners and Negroes— In this department we had 95 workers with an expenditure over \$100,000. These classes of people are a menace to our civilization. Our only remedy is to give them the gospel.

Mountain Schools - The number is 51. We have 5000 pupils taught by 235 teachers. The Board pays \$55,000 to defray a part of the expenses. For improvement we have spent over \$100,000. The income is approximately \$200,000. The total valuation of property is \$1,500,000. The schools are fulfilling an important mission. We have 290 ministers, besides the many boys and girls who have received their first vision of a higher life.

In Cuba and Panama -- Among the people in these two places we have a great work started with 80 workers at an expense of \$75,000.

Soldiers, Seamen and Marines — With an appropriation of \$25,000

and 15 workers we are supplying a need.

Church extention— This field has a large opportunity for usefulness. We gave aid to 100 churches with an income of \$190,000.

Southern Baptist Sanitorium— Our Board used \$40,000 on this institution. We have a place where our people may go for treatment and have suitable environment.

Let our brethren and their churches share in this great work that is on among our Southern Baptists.

### FOREIGN MISSIONS

We are glad to know that our Foreign Mission work is growing. The Baptists of our great Southland are living nearer to the command of Jesus, when he said, "go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature". All are not actually going into all the world, but a large majority of them are helping to send others there.

During the campaign years until Jan. 1, 1924, out of the \$48,498-219.75 paid in, \$9,235,521.66 went to the Foreign Mission Board. With this money it was possible for the Board to extend its work into seven new countries—Spain, Jugo-Slavia, Hungary, Roumania, Russia, Siberia and Palestine. This adds approximately 128 million to our possible missionary audience. During those years a larger amount of work was done in the old fields. The number of churches has increased 76 per cent. with an increase in membership of 108 per cent. Mission schools have increased 55 per cent., while the number of students increased 108 per cent. The number of Foreign missionaries has increased 63 per cent. and the number of native missionaries employed 264 per cent. The number of hospitals has

increased 21 per cent. and the number of treatments given in hospitals 61 per cent. Other things have increased in proportion. During this period the average increase in all phases of Foreign Mission work has been over 90 per cent.

This shows us what money will do, and should encourage us to make a desperate effort to see that all campaign pledges are paid before the year is out. By doing this we will untie the hands of our Foreign Mission Board so that they can strengthen and extend missionary operations. In this way we can more nearly fulfil that great command that we, as missionary Baptists, so firmly believe. Let us therefore, be praying, working and paying missionaries.

### ORPHANAGE

The Orphanage is the one vital living department of our denominational work that keeps us in constant touch with the crying needs of our dependent children.

For 39 years this work has been growing until we are now caring for 550 children at Thomasville and the Kennedy Home and 312 out in the state with their mothers.

The current fund necessary to maintain the Orphanage is around \$175,000 the year, not including buildings and improvements. The contributions of one Sunday in each month from the Sunday School and a great Thanksgiving offering equal to ONE DAY'S INCOME has become the main source of supply. The marvelous way in which the Lord has blessed this big home is a loud call for our continued loyalty. The denomination from mountain to sea has been wonderfully strengthened by the reflex influence of their generous giving to the Orphanage.

The helpless childhood of our state lays upon us the obligation to widen our work and to reach out the hands of help to those who are without a penny, a home, or a friend. And there are hundreds of children in North Carolina utterly destitute who are as worthy and as promising as those who already enjoying the blessing and protection of the Orphanage. So the task ever widens and we are therefore asking the Sunday Schools and churches of this association to make larger investments in the Orphanage.

## Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church-

4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, in such a way as the Association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making at the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

10. The Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship

any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

### **Abstract of Principles**

1. We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2. We believe that the Bible, the New and old Testaments, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

### **Rules of Order**

1. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject ex-

cept by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

## P-R-O-C-E-E-D-I-N-G-S

Friday, Aug. 28th, 1925.

11. On motion of the body the Old Executive Committee was retained for another year.

12. Homes for delegates and visitors were assigned.
13. On motion adjourned till 1:45 P. M. Prayer by Rev. J. R. Shoemate.

6. Report on Biblical Recorder submitted by J. S. Hopkins as written by I. T. Johnston of last year, and discussed by M. A. Huggins and others.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is the developing of the mind spiritual and bringing into active display, that knowledge that has been acquired by the training of others; therefore the result of future

activities of our people in Kingdom work depends greatly on how they are taught, and what they are taught.

Our churches should take a very active part in the training of our young people, as well as the older membership of our churches who do not understand.

People who do things have active trained minds and remember facts. They are trained to put their thoughts together and develop ideas.

The great need of the day is a better trained church membership in Kingdom work; therefore we beg to submit the following.

1 Home training. Are we as fathers and mothers neglecting our children in this respect? Remember their future usefulness depends greatly on their home training. Just a reminder lest we forget.

2. That we become more interested in Sunday school work because the Sunday school is the best place to impress upon the minds of our young people the great questions of missions.

3. That each church has during the year a school on the stewardship of Missions. Study books can be had from the Sunday School Board. We think this will help to solve the mission question that now exists in some of our churches.

We highly recommend our Denominational Schools to all that can attend them.

It is very needful that our churches take a more active part in training of our young people. Let us not so carelessly neglect them, because they are the Lord's heritage and he needs them in the Kingdom work.

### Baptist Hospital

The North Carolina Baptist Hospital is located at Winston Salem. It is owned and controlled by the Baptist of North Carolina.

This institution is modern in every respect and is doing a wonderful work. There are forty physicians who are equal to the best in the South. For the first 23 months, they served about 3000 patients 350 of whom were charity patients. The valuation of the plant is estimated at \$298,000 and can serve 4000 patients a year.

The death rate is only 12 to the thousand, many of the physicians are specialists in their professions, while a great deal of charity work is being done, we should bear in mind that all of these are cared for at the expense of somebody.

Mother's Day was used for "Hospital Day" and a substantial offering was made for the benefit of the Hospital. We recommend that all of our sick and suffering be carried to this institution if possible, and that all of our people see to it that this worthy institution never suffer for lack of their support. They teach their nurces that all must be done for Christ's sake and the sick must be the center of their thoughts, prayer and care. Charity patients and all others are treated alike, the nurses know no difference in their patients.

We request that prayer be made daily for this institution.

4. Report on State Missions by Rev. J. O. Spencer.

### STATE MISSIONS

95 Years ago the Baptist State Mission Board of North Car-

olina was organized. Since that time much good has been accomplished, through the agency of the Board, many weak churches have been strengthened. We are grieved to have to report at this time a debt on the Board of approximately \$80,000. We will be compelled to make retrenchments along the lines unless we can find some way to relieve the Board of some of the debt.

In view of the progress being made by North Carolina along all lines, it would be nothing short of a calamity for us to retrench at this time. The watchword ought to be "ENLARGEMENT" instead of "RETRENCHMENT".

Therefore in view of the fact that the State Mission Board during all the years of the convention's life has been the pioneer and burden bearer for all phases of our work. We would earnestly urge that all the churches in this association pray and give unceasingly, until this debt is lifted from our State Mission Board. Therefore we would ask all our churches to observe September 7th, as state mission day, or at least some time before January 1st, make an offering to state missions.

May the blessings of God be richly upon the Board and our beloved Secretary.

5. Report on home missions called for, no report being prepared it was agreed to use report of last year.

#### HOME MISSIONS

We are deeply concerned about all the phases of our mission work; Foreign, Home and State, but it seems that there some who are unwilling to join heartily in Mission work. There are those who are opposed to any form of missions, but the host of God-fearing and liberty-loving Baptists are marching on to Zion through our Mission Board.

Home Missions embrace work for the Master in the Southland. Our board at Atlanta, Georgia, is the agency through which our Baptist forces combine their resources and their energies to make desert places to garden into veritable gardens of the Lord in the countryside and the growing towns and cities in the newer sections of our country. The activities are so many that we can only write briefly of each.

Co-operative Missions—This is one of our five departments. In co-operation with mission work in each state we are able to do effective work. The sum of about \$175,000 is used in this work.

**Evangelism and Enlistment**—Results in this two years ago justified their consideration, there are 80 workers. During the past year we spent \$150,000. From the field 15,000 conversions are reported.

**Foreigners and Negroes**—In this department we had 95 workers with an expenditure over \$100,000. These classes of people are a menace to our civilization. Our only remedy is to give them the gospel.

**Mountain Schools**—The number is 51. We have 500 pupils taught by 235 teachers. The board pays \$55,000 to defray a part of the expences. For improvement we have spent over \$100,000 The income is approximately \$200,000. The total valuation of property is \$1,500,000. The schools are fulfilling an important mission. We have 290 ministers, besides the many boys and girls who have received their first vision of a higher life.

**In Cuba and Panama**—Among the people in these two places we have a great work started with 80 workers at an expense of \$75,000

**Soldiers, Seamen and Marines**—With an appropriation of \$25 000 and 15 workers we are supplying a need.

**Church extension**—This field has a large opportunity for usefulness. We gave aid to 100 churches with an income of \$190,000

**Southern Baptist Sanitorium**—Our Board used \$40,000 on this institution. We have a place where our people may go for treatment and have suitable environment.

Let our brethern and their churches share in this great work that is on among our Southern Baptist.

It was a hated and despised Samaritan that Christ took as his great example to teach the meaning of the commandment, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself". He dared to set up a new standard in narrow, prejudiced, patriotic, 100 per cent, Judaistic Palestine. His countrymen rejected it, but all who follow Him must make that standard theirs. We can not limit the commandment with lines of race or nation or creed. All the people of the earth are our neighbors. We are definitely commanded to love them, to serve their needs and to carry the gospel to them, to baptize them and to teach them "to observe all things whatsoever

### REPORT ON ORPHANAGE

Our Orphan's home at Thomasville, N. C. and Kennedy Home near Kinston, N. C. are supported by the Baptist of North Carolina, we need only to know the needs and the worth of this institution to give to its support freely. It accomodates about 650 children who are dependent to a great extent upon the Baptist of North Carolina for their support.

The cost for each child for a year is approximately \$250 or \$21 per month.

The demand of the Orphan's Home is greater than its equipment and resources can supply, as its needs are increasing yearly shall we Baptists of Ashe County not do more active giving than ever before for our Orphanage in order that some worthy child may not be denied the great life that God has enowed it with?

The various churches with their great wealth and abundance should give more freely of what the Lord has blessed them with to relieve the wants of these orphans that have been left in our care.



We insist, therefore, that our Pastors, Sunday School Superintendents and Teachers impress upon the minds of their congregations and classes their duty toward this great object of charity.

### Sunday Schools

#### Report of Last Year

Without criticizing the former excellent reports on Sunday schools, or by inference reflecting upon them, your committee has decided to take another tack, and instead of adding to the words of wisdom emphasizing the value of the Sunday-school to the church which grace the old minutes, give some figures that to our minds speak louder than any words of ours can speak. These figures are taken from our last minutes.

The expenses of all the Sunday-schools in Ashe County as reported last year amounted to \$215.25 annually. That is the members of Baptist Churches in Ashe County contribute about ten cents per member ty the Sunday school work.

Ten of our thirty eight Baptist Churches reported no Sunday school whatever, a twenty five per cent deficiency.

Out of our 2526 members of Baptist Churches in Ashe County only 650 were reported enrolled in Sunday-schools; and this 650 is the number that is enrolled in Sunday school, which of course includes more than can be counted as regular attendants. About one in four of the white population of North Carolina is enrolled in all the Sunday-schools of the state. Ashe County Baptists make a worse showing than this sorry proportion, as less than one in four of our own church members are enrolled in our Sunday schools.

The average number of teachers reported for Sunday schools of the county is three.

About six Sunday schools in the county report that they are open all the year.

Between the lines of these figures, your committee reads: That there are too few classes, that little effort has been made to grade the Sunday schools, and that practically no equipement for teaching, except a small amount of literature, is provided. That the

adult church members are largely uninterested and that only a part of the younger members of our churches are enrolled in Sunday school. That our pastors do not take the same interest, (there are some shining exceptions, thank God!) in the Sunday schools that they do in regular church services.

Your committee would set as a goal for Ashe County Baptists:

1. A Sunday school in every church, open the year round.
2. One hundred per cent, resident church membership enrolled.
3. Increase contributions to provide sufficient literature and equipment.
4. Organized and graded Sunday schools, with at least five classes and more where practicable.
5. A county wide or Association wide effort to provide teacher training for our Sunday school teachers.
6. The selection of officers and teachers of irreproachable Christian character.

Shakespeare says, "If to do were as easy as to know what were well to do then chapels had been churches and poor men's hovels princes palaces". We have set a high standard which we cannot reach at a single flight. But we can work with our ideals among the stars and climb higher than if we are satisfied with the shabby showing our last minute disclosed. "A man's reach should exceed his grasp or what's a Heaven for?"

This is a worthy program, and if carried out would double the efficiency of our churches and mightily please our Lord Jesus, who spent His Sabbath days teaching the Scripture in the synagogues of Capernaum and Galilee.

## CONSTITUTION

### NAMES

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### OBJECTS

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

### MEMBERSHIP

Article 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

### ORGANIZATION

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer in such a way as the Association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association to pay them out as the Association may direct and make a report at each annual session.

### TIME AND PLACE

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

### APPOINTMENTS

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. The Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association and Baptist Hospital:

### ORDER OF RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

### PREROGATIVES

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

### CONSTITUTION HOW AMENDED

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

### Abstract of Principles

1st. We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son and

the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the new and old Testaments is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th: We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

### Rules of Order

1st. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2nd. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3rd. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.

4th. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5th. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6th. It will be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking

16. The Association agreed to use the report on Biblical Recorder last year. Rev. N. C. Teague and Prof. J. O. Goodman took part in the discussion of this subject.

### Report on Biblical Recorder

This is an age of information. People are reading more than ever before in the history of the world. This is especially true in Ashe County and Northwestern North Carolina. Daily motor mail service has ment a daily paper in hundreds of homes west of the Blue Ridge on the day of publication. Our people have had their horizon widened and the gateway to the outside world opened as never before. All this is well. Ashe County Baptists welcome the new era and pray for greater progress.

However, every progressive moment in other realms of thought and action and material development within our borders imposes new obligations upon us who uphold the banner of the Baptist church and or King Immanuel. If our growth is mental, moral and spiritur as well as physical, our information and reading must be of the right sort, and unless we desire a lop-sided development, we certainly must not neglect religious literature. First of all, we should dust off our famlly Bibles and commune with the master minds, who we believe held communion as they wrote with the Divine. Next, we should plan for ourselves and our children to receive reading matters as vairied as we wish our lives to be and our denominational paper assuredly have a place in any well chosen list.

Baptist in North Carolina are particularly fortunate in having the Biblical Recorder, a publication that in arrangement and subject matter compares favorably with the secular and religious papers of the country. It has departments which are of interest to every member of the family. Its readers are informed by its pages of the activities of the denomination as they can be in no other way.

What would you think of a physician who has no medical books in his library and does not read any of the new developments in realm of medical science? What would you think of a lawyer who has no law books in his library and who has no method of keeping up with happenings in the legal world? What would you think of a christian who is ignorant of the great text-book of the christian, the Bible?

And what would you think of a Baptist who for the pittance of \$2.00 per year debar himself and his family of the wealth of information and inspiration to be found in a state denominational paper, the Biblical Recorder? Let's give it 100 per cent subscription list in Ashe Association. It will help the Baptist cause in Ashe County immeasurably more.

19. The Report on Foreign Missions was submitted and read by B. H. Duncan.

### **Foreign Missions Report—1926**

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has closed the eighty-first year of its great service as a clearing house of Southern Baptists for the dissemination of the gospel in the most destitute parts of the earth. These eighty-one years have been filled with perplexing problems, hard work, and often with discouragement. But there has been an almost unbroken progress in evangelistic achievement and expansion of the Kingdom of Christ. The last year was the best year in all the years of the Board's history and work.

The following facts should be carefully stored up by

pastors and messengers to this Association, and taken back to the whole membership of their churches.

I. Things Accomplished Last Year: 13,269 persons were baptized on our Foreign Mission fields during the last Southern Baptist Convention year. A gain of 1,135 over the previous year. The total membership is now 140,488. This membership is organized into 1,215 churches, 557 of which are self-supporting. These churches contributed last year \$444,258, or nearly \$4.00 per member.

We have on these fields, 1,818 Sunday Schools with 76,991 scholars, and 568 women's societies, with 13,649 members. There are also 574 young people's societies with a membership of 13,868. Of schools of all grades, including kindergarten up to theological seminaries, we had 920 with a total student body of 36,893 before the Board's finance made it necessary to discontinue many of these schools. It is found that more than 50 per cent. of the baptisms reported for the year was among these students in our Christian schools on the foreign fields.

The medical work of the Board for the year consisted of 214,910 treatments administered to 69,583 patients, of which 5,498 were in-patients. 934 of these operations performed by the Board's medical staff were major operations.

II. Financial Condition of the Board: The Board started the year 1925-26 with a heavy debt and loud calls from its missionaries for re-enforcement and relief. During the year the Board received from the Co-operative Program \$1,071,834.16; in designated gifts \$240,613.05; and in total gifts to the Christmas Love Offering, \$811,344.11. The debt was substantially reduced, but there was left in indebtedness of \$727,000. The women of the South have undertaken to raise as a Christmas offering about Christmas time \$300,000 toward the further reduction of this debt.

The Board for more than three years denied the missionaries all equipment, such as residence, church buildings, school and hospital buildings, and has now for some time discontinued appointment of missionaries, although there has been sad depletion of the missionary staff by death and resignations.

The world which the Foreign Mission Board is facing is one in desperate need, but a world ready for Christ, its only hope. Will the Baptists of this Association suffer their beloved missionaries and their Foreign Mission Board to appeal in vain to them? Will they ignore the cries of a lost



and ruined world for which Christ died and for which we have a sure and only remedy? The world needs the gospel; hundreds of young people are ready to carry it, and our people have the money to send them, if they would only give it.

### **Report On Home Missions**

A great many good people will tell you that they do not believe in Foreign Missions but that they do believe in Home Missions. No Baptist has the right to take that attitude toward Foreign Missions; and according to the Baptist interpretation of the Scriptures, no Christian has the right to take it. However, the needs of the Home Mission Board present a fine opportunity for those who take this position to prove their sincerity. It is a testing time. Also, these needs appeal to every believer in our denominational program.

The excellent report of a year ago set out in detail the phases of work of the Home Mission Board, with headquarters at Atlanta. Your committee recommends that report to the Baptists of Ashe county for careful study and prayerful consideration.

Recently, the Home Mission Board has been forced to make severe and drastic retrenchment in many phases of its work. In spite of white harvest fields all over the South and unprecedented calls from Cuba and Panama, the Board has had to stand still and even go backward. It is burdened by debt. It has not the funds to carry on its great work.

Perhaps the work of the Board that comes nearest the hearts of Ashe county Baptists is the support and maintenance of more than 50 mountain schools. Mountain View, in Wilkes county, is a fine example, and one that should be near enough to enlist our sympathy and aid. The trustees hope to make it a Junior College. It must be made a Junior College or perish in competition with state high schools. Your committee recommends this institution to the liberality of those who want to keep their money near home and render a service to our very own.

The gospel must be preached, 'beginning at Jerusalem.' Our Baptist program calls for its being preached to the uttermost ends of the earth. Our Home Mission Board is en-

titled to increased contributions from loyal Baptists. Let us hope that Ashe county Baptists will have a vision and act upon it.

Preaching in the grove at 11:30 a. m. Saturday morning by Rev. K. D. Stukenbrok. Rev. W. F. Barker to preach the closing sermon Saturday evening.

24. Rev. N. C. Teague preached from Phillipians, 1st chapter and 5th verse, "Your Fellowship In the Gospel."

25. Homes for Messengers were assigned.

26. On motion of the body, the Association was to stand adjourned till 9:30 Saturday morning. Rev. W. E. Denney led the closing prayer.

27. Rev. J. O. Spencer preached at 8:30 Friday night on the subject of "Faithfulness."

## SECOND DAY—SATURDAY, AUGUST 28

### Morning Session

28. The Association came together at 9:30 a. m. and Rev. H. M. Winkler conducted the devotional service.

29. On motion of Ira T. Johnston, it was moved that the Executive Committee and pastors meet at some appointed time and place at least one month before the next Association to make out a programme to arrange a place for all reports and religious exercises, and that the next Association hold a three-day session. Motion carried.

30. Rev. and Mrs. E. M. Harris, pastor of Memorial Baptist church, Pedu Association, South Carolina, were seated with the body; also Bro. Frank Doughton from Alleghany Association.

31. Report on Christian Education submitted by Rev. W. E. Denney and discussed by Rev. K. D. Stukenbrok and others, taking into consideration the importance of our Baptist schools. On motion, the report was adopted.

### Report On Christian Education

Christian Education is the developing of the mind spiritually and bringing into active display, that knowledge that

has been acquired by the training of others; therefore, the result of future activities of our people in Kingdom work depends greatly on how they are taught, and what they are taught.

Our churches should take a very active part in the training of our young people, as well as the older membership of our churches who do not understand.

People who do things have actively trained minds and remember facts. They are trained to put their thoughts together and develop ideas.

The great need of the day is a better trained church membership in Kingdom work; therefore, we beg to submit the following:

I. Home Training: Are we as fathers and mothers neglecting our children in this respect? Remember their future usefulness depends greatly on their home training. Just a reminder lest we forget.

II. That we become more interested in Sunday School work, because the Sunday School is the best place to impress upon the minds of our young people the great question of missions.

III. That each church has during the year a school on the Stewardship of Missions. Study books can be had from the Sunday School Board. We think this will help to solve the mission question that now exists in some of our churches.

IV. Our denominational schools can only more fully develop that knowledge that has been acquired by our young people in the home, the Sunday School and church life.

We highly recommend our denominational schools to all that can attend them.

It is very needful that our churches take a more active part in training of our young people. Let us not so carelessly neglect them, because they are the Lord's heritage, and He needs them in the Kingdom work.

32. Report on Baptist Hospital by Rev. J. D. Sexton; read, and on motion, adopted by asking every church to take a collection during the year for its support.

### **Report On Baptist Hospital**

We are glad the Baptists have a hospital within reach of the people of Western North Carolina.

In the days of Christ and His apostles they healed the

sick, and Christ Himself bore our sickness, Matthew 8:17. When Christ sent out the seventy, He told them to heal the sick, Luke 10:9. So we would say to the churches of the Ashe Association, let us help keep up the great work that is begun among us.

He that taketh hold of the plow and looketh back is not fit for the kingdom, Luke 9:62. Jesus said in Matthew 25:36: "I was sick and you visited me." We can visit the sick, but we can't heal them. But we can contribute to our Baptist hospital and help them to be healed. Healing the sick is a part of the gospel. So let us practice it all.

#### Evening Session

34. The Association met in business session at 1:30 p. m., by engaging in song service. Prayer by Rev. N. C. Teague.

35. Committee on Report of Orphanage not being present, the Association agreed to use last year's report. After being read it was discussed by Rev. K. D. Stukenbrok, who urged that each church exhaust its own resources before calling on the Orphanage for help. Bro. Dave Harless suggested that the churches all make up and send produce. The following pastors and laymen agreed to try this plan: Bros. F. L. Houck and Bryan Oliver, and Revs. J. M. Hayes, H. M. Winkler, C. W. Sexton, and W. E. Denney. On motion, the report was adopted.

#### Report Or Orphanage

Our orphans' home at Thomasville, N. C., and Kennedy Home near Kinston, N. C., are supported by the Baptists of North Carolina. We need only to know the needs and the worth of this institution to give to its support freely. It accommodates about 650 children who are dependent to a great extent upon the Baptists of North Carolina for their support.

The cost for each child for a year is approximately \$250, or \$21 per month.

The demand of the orphanage is greater than its equipment and resources can supply, as its needs are increasing yearly. Shall we Baptists of Ashe county not do more active giving than ever before for our Orphanage, in order

that some worthy child may not be denied the great life that God has endowed it with?

The various churches with their great wealth and abundance should give more freely of what the Lord has blessed them with to relieve the wants of these orphans that have been left in our care.

We insist, therefore, that our pastors, Sunday School superintendents and teachers impress upon the minds of their congregations and classes their duty toward this great object of charity.

36. Report on Sunday Schools by J. O. Spencer. On motion, old report used and adopted. Rev. K. D. Stukenbrok urged all the pastors to try to create a more efficient Sunday school in their churches.

#### Report Of Sunday Schools

Without criticizing the former excellent reports on Sunday Schools, or by inference reflecting upon them, your committee has decided to take another tack, and instead of adding to the words of wisdom emphasizing the value of the Sunday School to the church which grace the old minutes, give some figures that, to our minds, speak louder than any words of ours can speak. These figures are taken from our last minutes.

The expenses of all the Sunday schools in Ashe county as reported last year amounted to \$215.25 annually. That is, the members of Baptist churches in Ashe county contribute about ten cents per member by the Sunday school work.

Ten of our thirty-eight Baptist churches reported no Sunday school whatever—a twenty-five per cent. deficiency.

Out of our 2,526 members of Baptist churches in Ashe county, only 650 were reported enrolled in Sunday schools; and this 650 is the number that is enrolled in Sunday school, which, of course, includes more than can be counted as regular attendants. About one in four of the white population of North Carolina is enrolled in all the Sunday schools of the state. Ashe county Baptists make a worse showing than this sorry proportion, as less than one in four of our own church members are enrolled in our Sunday schools.

The average number of teachers reported for Sunday schools of the county is three.

About six Sunday schools in the county report that they

are open all the year.

Between the lines of these figures, your committee reads: That there are too few classes; that little effort has been made to grade the Sunday schools, and that practically no equipment for teaching, except a small amount of literature is provided. That the adult church members are largely uninterested and that only a part of the younger members of our churches are enrolled in Sunday school. That our pastors do not take the same interest (there are some shining exceptions, thank God!) in the Sunday schools that they do in regular church services.

Your committee would set as a goal for Ashe county Baptists:

I. A Sunday school in every church—open the year 'round.

II. One hundred per cent. resident church membership enrolled.

III. Increase contributions to provide sufficient literature and equipment.

IV. Organized and graded Sunday schools, with at least five classes more where practicable.

V. A county wide, or association wide, effort to provide teacher training for our Sunday school teachers.

VI. The selection of officers and teachers of irreproachable Christian character.

Shakespeare says: "If to do were as easy as to know what were well to do, then chapels had been churches and poor men's hovels princes' palaces." We have set a high standard, which we cannot reach at a single flight. But we can work with our ideals among the stars and climb higher than if we are satisfied with the shabby showing our last minute disclosed. "A man's reach should exceed his grasp, or what's a Heaven for?"

This is a worthy program, and if carried out, would double the efficiency of our churches and mightily please our Lord Jesus, who spent His Sabbath days teaching the Scripture in the synagogues of Capernaum and Gililee.

## CONSTITUTION NAMES

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

## OBJECTS

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

## MEMBERSHIP

Article 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

## ORGANIZATION

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer in such a way as the Association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

## DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association to pay them out as the Association may direct and make a report at each annual session.

## TIME AND PLACE

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

## APPOINTMENTS

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. The Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Fi-

nance, Place and Preacher for next Association and Baptist Hospital.

### ORDER OF RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

### PEROGATIVES

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

### CONSTITUTION—HOW AMENDED

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

### Abstract of Principles

1st. We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the new and old Testaments, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

### Rules of Order

1st. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2nd. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.



3rd. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.

4th. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5th. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6th. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

**Friday, August 26th, 10 A. M.**

1st. The Ashe Association met in its 41st annual session with Buffalo Baptist Church Friday, August 26, at 10 A. M.

2nd. Rev. S. C. Blackburn led the Association in song and worship, after which Rev. J. O. Spencer preached on the subject, "Vision and Service;" text, Acts 10:19 and Proverbs 29:8.

3rd. On motion of Ira T. Johnston the Association elected Prof. J. C. Goodman Moderator, and Bryan Oliver Clerk and Treasurer, by acclamation.

4th. Call for new churches. Grassy Creek and Oak Hill handed in letters and were received into the body.

5th. The reference in regard to the watch-care of Smethport and Pleasant Valley churches was taken up. The committee reported that all matters in question had been satisfactorily settled and that they knew no reason why they should not be admitted to the body. On motion the churches were received into full fellowship.

6th. The Moderator appointed the following committees:

(1) Obituaries—J. W. Duncan.

(2) Finance—Dell Goodman, J. E. Johnston, C. W. Sexton.

(3) Resolutions—Ira T. Johnston, T. K. Luther, H. M. Winkler.

(4) E. Z. Sexton, W. L. Campbell, Dell Goodman.

(5) Place and Preacher—Delegates from West Jefferson, Grassy Creek, Valley Home, Landmark, Liberty Grove and Apple Grove.

(6) Replacement—Delegates and pastor of Buffalo church.

7th. Upon invitation of the Moderator the following visitors were seated with the body:

Rev. J. F. Hodgson and wife, Emma Toon, from Lebanon Association; Rev. R. E. Caudill, Rev. N. C. Teague, representing Mountain View Institute, and J. L. Hemphill, of Brushy Mountain Association; H. L. Coffee, of the Alleghany Association; J. A. McKaughan, representing

the Biblical Recorder and organized missions; and P. C. Stringfield, representing Christian education, of Buncombe Association.

8th. A roll call of standing committees was made and the committee on Home and Foreign Missions being absent Rev. J. A. McKaughan was appointed to supply same.

9th. Report on State Missions was submitted by Bower H. Duncan, read by Rev. S. C. Blackburn, and adopted by the body.

### Report on State Missions

Ever since the day the Baptist State Convention was organized, March 26, 1830, at Greenville, with 14 members, its avowed purpose has been to give the Gospel to North Carolina, and then to all the world. How successfully the founders of the Convention and their successors have wrought may be seen by the following comparisons:

In 1830 there were only 15,000 Baptists in North Carolina, white and colored. There are now 375,767 white Baptists alone, and approximately 240,000 negro Baptists, making a total of around 600,000 or about 48 church members out of every 100 in North Carolina are Baptists. There is not a county in the State and scarcely a town of any size without a Baptist church. However, in many places the Baptist cause needs strengthening. The first year the Convention met it reported \$700.00 for Missions and Education, the two objects to which it contributed. Last year contributions to all benevolent objects, including Orphanage, amounted to \$737,317.

Not until 40 years ago, when Columbus Durham became Corresponding Secretary, devoting all of his time to the work, did the Baptist cause gain momentum. For 7 years, Dr. Durham threw himself into the work with the zeal of the early disciples. Then came John E. White for 5 years, followed by L. Johnson for 15 progressive years, when the cause went forward by leaps and bounds. Then came Walter N. Johnson for 5 years, during which period the 75 Million Campaign was launched and new financial levels were reached, which we have not been able to attain since. For the past seven and a half years Charles E. Maddry has directed in a masterly way the affairs of the Board as its executive head, being now the General Secretary of the General Board. He has associated with him in the direction of the State Mission Department A. C. Hamby, Mars Hill, and Walter Gilmore, Raleigh.

Notwithstanding the appropriation for State Missions has been reduced each year for the past four, from \$146,000 to \$132,000, then to \$92,000, and then to \$77,000 for this year, there is a debt of around \$60,000 on the running account of State Missions. Still more drastic cuts will be made next year unless there is a marked increase in the income of the Board. This would be suicidal to all

the work; for it is only as we strengthen the stakes at home that we can hope to lengthen the cords to the ends of the earth.

The Board is helping to sustain this year 87 missionary pastors who are serving 147 churches. The report at our last Convention showed 118 missionaries serving 200 churches, organizing 11 new churches, receiving by baptism 1,921, and 1,740 by letter and otherwise.

The task ahead of us in North Carolina is to evangelize 600,000 people over ten years of age who are not Christians; to enlist in all the work of the kingdom the 250,000 members who are doing nothing; to train for effective leadership our young people; to bring about a great revival of Christian stewardship. When this is done the Kingdom of God will come in a day. 23 cents out of each dollar given to the Co-operative Program will be devoted to the promotion of our State Mission work.

10th. Report on Baptist Co-operative Program was submitted by J. A. McKaughan, read by Ira T. Johnston and adopted by the body.

### The Baptist Co-operative Program

The General Board of the Baptist State Convention at its June meeting adopted \$600,000 as the goal for North Carolina Baptists to raise in 1928 for all the objects included in the Co-operative Program, except the Orphanage.

This objective is to be divided equally between State-wide and South-wide objects as follows:

#### Statewide Objects

Out of each dollar given, unless otherwise designated, the objects will receive the following amounts:

State Missions .....	23 cents
Baptist Schools .....	23 cents
Baptist Hospital .....	4 cents

Total ..... 50 cents

#### Southwide Objects

Foreign Missions .....	25 cents
Home Missions .....	11¼ cents
Theological Seminaries .....	8¼ cents
Ministers Relief .....	4½ cents
New Orleans Hospital .....	1 cent

Total ..... 50 cents

In co-operation with the other associations in the State we recommend that this association adopt the above ratio of division of its funds and that it set as its goal for 1928 \$....., which is

a little more than the association raised for the objects included in the Co-operative Program for 1926; that this amount be apportioned upon as fair and equitable a basis as possible among all of the churches of the association by the Executive Committee of the association, or by a special committee; and that each church endeavor to raise its objective by making an every member canvass Dec. 4-11, the South-wide date set, or at such other time as may seem best, or to raise it by some other method adopted by the church.

In order that this Every-member Canvass be successful, we would recommend further that the most thorough and prayerful preparation be made, beginning several weeks in advance, giving information about the objects included in the Program, and thoroughly indoctrinating the people with the idea of stewardship.

We also recommend that a Mission Leader be elected to represent this association in its dealing with the general State organization, and that this Mission Leader, in co-operation with the Executive Committee of the Association or a special Mission Committee to be appointed, communicate with each local church and try to effect a simple organization consisting of a Mission Leader and a Mission Committee of four others at least, and to co-operate with this committee in every possible way in putting on and successfully carrying through the Co-operative Program for 1928.

12th. On motion adjourned until 1:30 P. M. Prayer by Rev. N. C. Teague.

13th. The Association was opened by singing and prayer by Rev. C. W. Sexton.

14th. The report on Christian Education was submitted and read by Ira T. Johnston. After a discussion by Ira T. Johnston was adopted.

#### **Report on Christian Education**

It is the prophecy of many that within a generation the denominational schools will have perished, or will have been converted into state or non-sectarian institutions. This tendency is already apparent in that many denominational secondary schools have passed away within the past few years.

At the last meeting of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention the question of the denominational schools received serious consideration, and the matter of centering attention upon a few and giving up the others was discussed and recommended. It is difficult to say where this slaughter of church schools will end.

Perhaps slaughter is not the proper word, as most of them are being discontinued on account of lack of the proper support.

This is a matter which should give to all Baptists serious concern. Our denomination stands firmly for the principle that no religious instruction shall be given in the public and state institutions. Unless the denomination provides schools where religious instruction may be given, where are the leaders with the proper training to come from in the future? It is well known that few preachers come from the state institutions. While Christian education has been receiving a generous portion of the money contributed to the Co-operative Program, the amount has been grossly inadequate to supply the needs of our church institutions.

The situation in North Carolina is as follows: Wake Forest is in danger of being outclassed by institutions with large incomes and heavy endowment. Meredith College is in debt heavily and a special campaign has been found advisable largely because of the indebtedness of Meredith. Our secondary schools are either going out of business or struggling along on inadequate incomes. Our Junior Colleges are not having an easy path.

As stated a great special campaign is to be launched by action of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention for the raising of \$1,500,000.00 for our seven educational institutions, its purpose being to wipe out encumbering mortgages, to stop the payment of large sums of interest, to construct necessary new buildings, to supply vitally needed equipment, and to place our institutions somewhat on a par with competitive institutions of the state. The institutions to share in this fund are as follows: Boiling Springs, Campbell, Chowan, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest, Wingate.

Your committee recommends that all Baptists give to this campaign their hearty support and contribute to it as liberally as their means will permit. Unless this campaign succeeds our institutions will be greatly crippled and perhaps will not last the generation allotted them by gloomy prophets. Unless our denomination provides religious instruction for our boys and girls, they will not receive it. We will have no trained leaders, and without trained leaders we are destined for denominational disaster.

18th. Homes for Messengers were assigned.

19th. A collection amounting to \$6.00 was taken for

20th. Rev. J. D. Sexton preached on "The Love of God." Text, I John, 3:16.

25th. As it was expected that Dr. Lumpkin, of the Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem, would attend the Association, it was moved to defer the report on the Hospital until his arrival.

26th. No written report on the Orphanage being in it was moved to include in the minutes the last year's report. The report was discussed by Felix Houck, Rev. J. A. McKaughan, and P. C. Stringfield.

### Report on Orphanage

Our Orphans' Home at Thomasville, N. C., and Kennedy Home near Kinston, N. C., are supported by the Baptists of North Carolina. We need only to know the needs and the worth of this institution to give to its support freely. It accomodates about 650

children who are dependent to a great extent upon the Baptists of North Carolina for their support.

The cost for each child for a year is approximately \$250, or \$21 per month.

The demand of the Orphanage is greater than its equipment and resources can supply, as its needs are increasing yearly. Shall we Baptists of Ashe county not do more active giving than ever before for our Orphanage, in order that some worthy child may not be denied the great life that God has endowed it with?

The various churches with their great wealth and abundance should give more freely of what the Lord has blessed them with to relieve the wants of these orphans that have been left in our care.

We insist, therefore, that our pastors, Sunday School superintendents and teachers impress upon the minds of their congregations and classes their duty toward this great object of charity.

#### **Report on Biblical Recorder**

This is an age of information. People are reading more than ever before in the history of the world. This is especially true in Ashe County and Northwestern North Carolina. Daily motor mail service has meant a daily paper in hundreds of homes west of the Blue Ridge on the day of publication. Our people have had their horizon widened and the gateway to the outside world opened as never before. All this is well. Ashe County Baptists welcome the new era and pray for greater progress.

However, every progressive movement in other realms of thought and action and material development within our borders imposes new obligations upon us who uphold the banner of the Baptist church and King Immanuel. If our growth is mental, moral and spiritual as well as physical, our information and reading must be of the right sort, and unless we desire a lop-sided development, we certainly must not neglect religious literature. First of all, we should dust off our family Bibles and commune with the



master minds, who we believe held communion as they wrote with the Divine. Next, we should plan for ourselves and our children to receive reading matter as varied as we wish our lives to be and our denominational paper assuredly has a place in any well chosen list.

Baptists in North Carolina are particularly fortunate in having the Biblical Recorder, a publication that in arrangement and subject matter compares favorably with the secular and religious papers of the country. It has departments which are of interest to every member of the family. Its readers are informed by its pages of the activities of the denomination as they can be in no other way.

What would you think of a physician who has no medical books in his library and does not read any of the new developments in the realm of medical science? What would you think of a lawyer who has no law books in his library and who has no method of keeping up with happenings in the legal world? What would you think of a Christian who is ignorant of the great text-book of the Christian, the Bible?

And what would you think of a Baptist who for the pittance of \$2.00 per year debarbs himself and his family of the wealth of information and inspiration to be found in a State denominational paper, the Biblical Recorder? Let's give it a 100 per cent subscription list in Ashe Association. It will help the Baptist cause in Ashe County immeasurably more.

Our Baptist Hospital located at Winston-Salem is the youngest child of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and is now only four years old.

It is the latest creation in hospital construction.

It has a medical and surgical staff unsurpassed in the South.

It has the lowest death rate on record.

The Great Physician is the Chief of its staff.

We are caring for over 500 charity patients and over 500 part pay patients every year. Since the organization of this institution we have cared for more than 6,000 patients, and they have come from every walk of life, the missionary, the preacher and his wife, the widow, and the orphan, disabled ministers, the lawyer, the doctor, the merchant, the farmer, the rich and the poor have come and they have been received with a glad heart and given the best.

The Hospital is growing in popularity every day, and there is an increasing demand from our churches for charity work; this demand grows far more rapidly than the response to the call for charity funds on Mother's Day.

**THEREFORE**, your committee recommends:

1st. That the Hospital may be able to offer its care and healing to an increased number of charity patients, churches sending free patients shall use every possible means to determine whether the applicant for charity really needs such help, and that the church sending a charity patient shall endeavor to pay the sum of \$1.50 per day for the care of this patient.

2nd. That every church in the Ashe Association be urged to put on the Mother's Day program for the Hospital and make an offering on that day for charity work, even if the offering is no more than the regular Sunday School collection. Remember this is

the Convention's plan for the support of this work, and there is no other source of supply for this work.

3rd. That the Baptist host of Ashe County will pray for the institution, and ask the Great Physician to be present always in its ministry of healing, and talk about it to their friends, recommend it to the consideration of all Baptist people, and endeavor to secure the united interest of our churches in the great work of healing the sons of men.

The Hospital needs your support, your sympathy and prayers and you need its superior, Christian care and love.

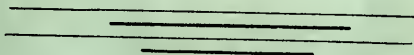

## CONSTITUTION

---

### NAME

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe association.

### Objects

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

### Membership

Article 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained

ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

#### Organization

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer in such a way as the Association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

#### Duties of Officers

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

#### Time and Place

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

#### Appointments

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. The Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

#### Order of Religious Exercises

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be sched-

uled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

### Prerogatives

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

### Constitution—How Amended

Article 15 This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1st. We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testaments, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3d. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

## RULES OF ORDER

1st. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2d. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3d. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.

4th. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5th. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6th. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

1. The Ashe Association met in its 42nd annual session with Landmark Baptist church, Friday, Aug. 31, 1928, at 10 a. m.

Introductory Sermon by Rev. C. W. Sexton. Text Revelations 3: 20, "Behold I stand at the door and knock." This sermon was a wonderful inspiration to Ashe County Baptists.

2. Moved that officers be elected by acclamation: Prof. J. C. Goodman elected Moderator and Bryan Oliver elected Clerk and Treas.

3. Reception of new churches—Chestnut Hill was admitted into the body.

4. Reception of Visiting Brethren—Rev. Walter M. Gilmore, Baptist State Board, Raleigh, N. C., C. J. Carter, Rock Castle Association of West Virginia, Rev. J. F. Hodgson, of Lebanon Association of Virginia, Rev. H. L. Coffey, Alleghany Association, N.C., Rev. David Blackburn, New River Association, Virginia, and Prof. Edgar R. Settle, Prin. Mountain View Institute, were seated with the body.

5. Moved that the Chairman be allowed to appont the Executive Committee.

6. The delegations from the following churches were appointed as a Committee on Place and Preacher for next year: Grassy Creek, West Jefferson, Healing Springs, New River, Beaver Creek, Chestnut Hill and Valley Home. Each delegation was to have one vote.

7. Moved that the Moderator appoint a Committee on Temperance to report at this association. Rev. S. C. Blackburn, Rev. H. M. Winkler, and Rev. W. E. Denney were appointed.

8. Other Committees were appointed by the Moderator as follows:  
1. Resolutions: Prof. G. H. Hatfield, Rev. E. Blevins, Rev. C. W. Sexton.

2. Finance: Walter Campbell, W. D. Brown, E. C. Eller.

3. Digest of Church Letters: A. Dell Goodman, E. Z. Sexton, W. H. McMillan.

9. Report on Biblical Recorder submitted by J. O. Goodman. After a discussion by Rev. Walter M. Gilmore and J. O. Goodman, the report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON THE BIBLICAL RECORDER

The first Biblical Recorder came from the press in 1833. The Baptist State Convention of 1841 passed a resolution that a corporation be formed to sustain a Baptist periodical in the state. Fifty nine years later substantially the same resolution was passed, and in 1901 a corporation was formed.

For lack of support the Recorder suspended publication during 1843, and in 1872 it barely escaped suspension. With these exceptions it has been published for ninety-five years. Thomas Meredith and J. H. Mills deserve honorable mention for their loyalty to, and untiring labors for, the Recorder during its critical periods.

The Recorder has witnessed the growth of North Carolina Baptists from 15,000 to 400,000. If it was needed to guide, inform and instruct fifteen or twenty thousand Baptists, surely it is needed for 400,000. When it goes regularly into homes, churches or associations, liberality, deeper spirituality, larger benevolence, and higher moral standards follow. It is a channel of information, a source of inspiration, and an anchor of faith.

For two dollars a year it will make 51 visits into a home and may prove a priceless blessing to any and all who read and heed its messages. Your committee earnestly pleads the support of every Christian in Ashe county and elsewhere in increasing its circulation and there by increasing its usefulness. Respectfully submitted.

#### STATE MISSIONS

During the 98 years of organized work among North Carolina Baptists the chief purpose has been to carry the gospel, through missions and education, to the state, and from the state to the ends

of the world. How well we have accomplished this work is shown by the enormous Baptist growth during this period. We have grown from an insignificant sect of about 15,000 to a strong and prosperous congregation of over 400,000. However, the work is not yet completed. There are among us thousands who know not the Christ.

Instead of following the partial victory of the Seventy-five Million Campaign with enthusiasm our interest has waned. A comparison of some of the most important items of our work will show how we are falling down. In 1922 we had 204 mission workers, in 1927 only 88, a decrease of 56.8%. The number of baptisms for the same period fell from 5,306 to 1,658 or 68.7%. The amount raised for state missions dropped from \$123,252.20 in 1926 to \$109,946.91 in 1927, or a drop of 10.8%. We are actually doing less for state missions than we did ten years ago. We are giving some more money but the high cost of living makes it impossible to keep so many workers in the field. We are not satisfied to live as we did in 1918, and we should not be satisfied to let our state mission work remain below the level set ten years ago.

May we awake to the responsibility and opportunity before us, and give to the work as God has prospered us. In this way raise the heavy debt on our State Board, and untie their hands so they may bring in a rich harvest of souls to the kingdom of God.

### FOREIGN MISSIONS

In spite of many hindrances the Foreign Mission Board has had a very good year's work.

There were 13,269 baptisms on the foreign fields. An increase of 1,184 over the preceding year.

The church members increased from 137,734 to 140,488.

Sunday school pupils increased from 71,734 to 76,991. There were more than fifty thousand patients treated in the various hospitals.

These encouraging results were achieved under many trying difficulties and serious handicaps. Many of the missionaries were at home.

The native believers in many places were under the trying conditions of war and strife yet God has blessed the efforts put forth in every country in which we are working.

Our total missionary force is now only four hundred and ninety, whereas a few years ago we had five hundred and forty four mis-

sionaries. There are however many things to encourage us. The debt on the foreign board which has so crippled the work, has been reduced during the year.

So let us as North Carolina Baptists reaffirm the central emphasis of our Master and recapture His passion for the redemption of the lost world.

Let our spirit be like that of David Livingstone who said: "I will go anywhere provided it is forward."

### BAPTIST CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The General Board of the Baptist State Convention at its June meeting adopted \$700,000 as the goal for North Carolina Baptists to raise in 1929 for all the objects included in the Co-operative Program, except the Orphanage.

This objective is to be divided equally between State-wide and South-wide objects as follows:

#### State-wide Objects

Out of each dollar given, unless otherwise designated, the objects will receive the following amounts:

State Missions .....	23	cents
Baptist Schools .....	23	cents
Baptist Hospital .....	4	cents
Total - - - - -	50	cents

#### South-wide Objects

Foreign Missions .....	25	cents
Home Missions .....	11 $\frac{1}{4}$	cents
Theological Seminaries .....	8 $\frac{1}{4}$	cents
Ministers' Relief .....	4 $\frac{1}{2}$	cents
New Orleans Hospital .....	1	cent
Total - - - - -	50	cents

In co-operation with the other associations in the State we recommend that this association adopt the above ratio of division of its funds and that it set as its goal for 1929 \$1,200 which is a little more than the association raised for the objects included in the Co-operative Program for 1927, that this amount be apportioned upon as fair and equitable a basis as is possible among all of the churches of the association by the Executive Committee of the association, or by a special committee; and that each church endeavor to raise its object-



ive by making an every-member canvass Dec. 4—11, the south-wide date set, or at such other time as may seem best, or to raise it by some other method adopted by the church.

In order that this Every-member Canvass be successful, we would recommend further that the most thorough and prayerful preparation be made, beginning several weeks in advance, giving information about the objects included in the Program, and thoroughly indoctrinating the people with the idea of stewardship.

We also recommend that a Mission Leader be elected to represent this association in its dealing with the general State organization, and that this Mission Leader, in co-operation with the executive Committee of the Ashe association or a special Mission Committee to be appointed, communicate with each local church and try to effect a simple organization consisting of a Mission Leader and a Mission Committee of four others at least, and to co-operate with this committee in every possible way in putting on and successfully carrying through the Co-operative Program for 1929.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The life of a nation depends upon its schools. The value of a school depends upon its ideals. The ideals of a school have their highest worth only as they are Christian. It is the duty of the churches to make these ideals dominant in education.

The necessity for maintaining our schools, great as it has been in the past, must increase rather than diminish for the future for the following reasons.

1. Because our institutions must be kept in the front rank along with those of the State in cultural training that they give, or we cannot hope to keep our Baptist boys and girls in our schools.
2. Because practically nine-tenths of our educated ministers and missionaries must come out of our Baptist institutions. Moreover, the State is rapidly enlarging and strengthening her educational program and compelling all her children to be educated. This, of course, means a more intelligent membership in our churches, and that we must educate a still larger portion of our ministers and leaders; for an educated membership will demand an educated leadership.
3. Because Missions and Christian Education are simply different phases of the Program of Jesus. The one provides that the Gospel be sent; the other provides that those who go be trained for the task. One fails without the other and world evangelization fails without both Missions and Christian Education.

4. Because of the growing emphasis that is being placed upon education, thinking men and women, lovers of God and humanity, are concerned that education shall be of such a type as shall develop our youth in body and spirit and mind. To the question, "What can you do?" must be added another, "What ought you to do for God and humanity?" This question our Christian schools are seeking to keep ever before the young people who enter them. Our schools are making more effort today than ever before to so train the young people who come to them that when they go back to their home churches, they will prove useful and efficient members. The study of the Bible is required, provision is made for training in B. Y. P. U. and Sunday School work, and the Kingdom of God and His righteousness is exalted on the campus and in class room. In short, an atmosphere and environment is created in which the Spirit of Christ is dominant.

The response of the people to the Centennial Campaign has been heartening. Surely we must come up to our Centennial in 1930 with all the equipment which we are now using paid for.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The Sunday-school work stands out as one of the most vital agencies in Kingdom extension and development, and should be stressed by every pastor and church leader through out the State, nation, and the world.

The Sunday-school work is growing by leaps and bounds and is in popular favor with our people. We are realizing more and more the deep significance of Bible instruction. North Carolina has 94 Sunday-schools to each 100 churches. In North Carolina there are 85 in Sunday-school to 100 church members, yet there are thousands of Baptist church members in the South that need to be enlisted in the Sunday-schools and millions that are out of the church that need to be brought into the fold through the Sunday-school. This must be done through the Sunday-school, if it is ever accomplished.

#### Teacher Training

The work of training Sunday-school teachers goes forward at a rapid pace. From Nov. 1, 1926 to Nov. 1, 1927 North Carolina has received 10,738 Normal Awards. The number of Administration Awards received during the past year is 2291, an increase of 450 per cent over last year. Teacher training is our greatest need and our hardest task. We must realize that when teachers are trained and efficient, our Sunday-schools will more nearly approach the goal set

for them in the aims and purposes set forth in Sunday-school organization and work. The need for trained Sunday-school teachers is just as vital as is the need for trained preachers.

Enlargement Campaigns in single churches and in groups of churches have been put on where the schools were enlarged and graded and the new organization started to functioning.

This is needed in the Ashe Association.

The goal for the churches of the Ashe Association should be an all the year round, active and efficient Sunday-school in every church. It can be done. What shall be our response to this challenge?

## CONSTITUTION

---

### NAME

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### Objects

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

### Membership

Article 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained



ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

#### Organization

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer in such a way as the Association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

#### Duties of Officers

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

#### Time and Place

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

#### Appointments

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. The Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

#### Order of Religious Exercises

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be sched-

uled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

### Prerogatives

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

### Constitution— How Amended

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1st We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testaments, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

## RULES OF ORDER

1st. Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2d. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3d. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.

4th. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5th. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6th. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS

The work of the Foreign Mission Board has made steady advance during the past year. There have been many difficulties in the way, but through the favor of the Lord there have appeared many encouragements. Fine progress has been made towards the reduction of the great debt which has burdened the board for so many years. The debt as set up on the books January 1, 1928 was \$1,145,000. By the 1st of May 1929 this debt had been reduced to \$802,506.88. This is most encouraging.

Missionaries have returned to all of our stations and have received a warm welcome. There are widespread and unmistakable evidences of a great revival. People are awaiting baptism in a great many places. They baptized last year 12,264 converts, or a little over 1000 every month or 33 every day.

In spite of all the problems on the foreign fields, we know that the gospel will certainly triumph whenever it is preached. The only discouragement worth considering is that which arises from lack of support here in the homeland. Thank God we can take care of this source of discouragement. We certainly have the resources in wealth. The question is whether we have enough spiritual resources sufficiently strong to make us respond to the needs. Do we love Christ who died for us? Do we really bear in mind the great truth that He died not for us only, but for all the world? God has waked up the whole world in our day. He must have had some purpose in this. Will we wake up to our privilege and duty to make known in all the world his precious saving grace?

So let our spirits be like that of Rice and Judson, R. Williams and Isaiah: here Lord, send me.

#### BIBLICAL RECORDER

The first Biblical Recorder came from the press in 1833. The Baptist State Convention of 1841 passed a resolution that a corporation be formed to sustain a Baptist periodical in the state. Fifty-nine years later substantially the same resolution was passed, and in 1901 a corporation was formed.

For lack of support the Recorder suspended publication during 1843, and in 1872 it barely escaped suspension. With these exceptions it has been published for ninety-six years. Thomas Meredith and J. H. Mills deserve honorable mention for their loyalty to, and untiring labors for, the Recorder during its critical periods.

The Recorder has witnessed the growth of North Carolina Baptists from 15,000 to 400,000. If it was needed to guide, inform and instruct fifteen or twenty thousand Baptists, surely it is needed for 400,000. When it goes regularly into homes, churches or associations, liberality, deeper spirituality, larger benevolence, and higher moral standards follow. It is a channel of information, a source of inspiration, and anchor of faith.

For two dollars a year it will make 51 visits into a home and may prove a priceless blessing to any and all who read and heed its messages. Your committee earnestly pleads the support of every Christian in Ashe county and elsewhere in increasing its circulation and thereby increasing its usefulness. Respectfully submitted.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

We re-affirm the position our association has consistently held and declared on the question of intoxicating liquors. We have ever believed that the manufacture, sale and use of alcoholic beverages is a menace to life and morals, a curse upon our people, and should be prohibited by law.

After years of agitation and effort the Christian forces of our State achieved the legal prohibition of the liquor traffic in North Carolina, and eventually saw the triumph of that cause in the enactment of the 18th Amendment to the National Constitution. It has been the contention of enemies of prohibition that this law could not be enforced because a majority of the people do not want it. Recent events seem to have answered that claim with overwhelming denial. Political leaders in the presidential campaign of last year insisted that that campaign was a national referendum on the liquor question. If that be so, then there can be no doubt as to the mind of the majority of America.

The people do want prohibition. It appears then that this law can be enforced. We call upon all officers of government, from township to the Nation's Capital, honestly to force the laws of our land.

We also believe that the law should be enforced with equal justice upon all, and demand of our courts of justice that for the rich and poor alike, for the ignorant and the educated, the humble and the high, justice shall be equal.

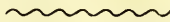

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### Objects

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

### Membership

Article 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained

ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

#### Organization

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer in such a way as the Association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

#### Duties of Officers

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

#### Time and Place

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

#### Appointments

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. The Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

#### Order of Religious Exercises

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be sched-

uled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

### Prerogatives

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage

### Constitution—How Amended

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## Abstract of Principles

1st We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testaments, is Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3d We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgement.

9th We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

### RULES OF ORDER

1st Every session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2d When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3d When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.

4th No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5th No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6th It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

When we think of "State Missions" we think of our Christian Schools, our Hospital, Orphanage, Old Ministers' Relief, and the "Gospel" preached throughout the State.

In 100 years of organized work in North Carolina, there has been great progress made. According to the reports sent up to the 1929 associational meetings, which began the middle of July and continued till the middle of November, there were 2,307 white Baptist churches in the state, with a membership of 397,026, which is an increase of 26 churches and 10,621 members over 1928.

During last year there were baptized into the fellowship of 1,621 churches, 2,307 members.

And yet, with the progress that has been made, there remains a

tremendous task yet to be done.

There are nearly one and one-half million people in the state who are not affiliated with any church organization. For the most part, these are our own native people. What a great evangelistic opportunity this opens for the Baptists of the state.

Now the question is: What part are the Ashe county Baptists going to have in the salvation of this great number of unsaved?

Last year we gave to State Missions through the co-operative program \$536.82, and yet considering the tremendous need, we urge that the churches of our association give more to state missions the coming year than ever before.

"Fellowship week" in our association will offer us an opportunity to pay our centennial pledges, which goes to the support of our schools. We urge that every one who pledged pay, and those who did not, that they also make a contribution to this worthy cause.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Home Missions is that group of missionary and evangelistic tasks which either because of their nature or their size and difficulty, can best be done by a Southwide agency.

The Home Mission Board is the Southwide agency through which Southern Baptists are doing their Home Mission work. The field of operation for this Board is the territory of the Southern Baptist convention, the four western provinces of Cuba and the canal zone.

The work for the ensuing year was laid out as instructed by the Convention on the basis of the cash receipts for the previous year. These receipts were \$407,357.58 on the Co-operative Program and \$32,397.18 supplemental receipts, making a total of \$439,743.76.

The Board sets aside \$250,000 to be paid on interest and principal of the debt. This necessitated some reduction in mission work, but by combining forces and consolidating mission stations, the Board is able to hold all of its debts intact, though with reduced personnel.

The Board has set itself definitely to the task of paying its debts, with the determination that when once out of debt, it will absolutely stay out of debt. Since September 1928, it has paid interest and principal on its indebtedness \$713,987.57. The reduction of the debt, however, is being made with the least possible inroads upon the mission work. The minimum amount that can be paid on interest and principal of the debt has been set aside as a fixed item in the budget of appropriations. Therefore any increase in contributions

will mean an increase in mission work.

Last year we had 168 workers and they baptized 2,219 people. This was 13 baptisms per worker. When we remember a great deal of this work is with very difficult groups like Foreigners here in our midst, in Cuba and Panama, who have a background of Catholic teaching, this compares favorably with any mission work that our Baptist people are doing.

Our people need to recognize the tremendous importance just now of our Home Mission work. The new day of industrialization is giving us a new set of Mission Problems. Cities are growing very rapidly. Industrial communities are springing up almost over night. The tide of immigration is turning toward the South. All these things create a real need for Home Missions. Our task is to mobilize our home forces for world-conquest for Christ and our Home Mission work has a big place in this mobilization process.

To have them we must have preachers who will preach missions. Preachers let's shift the responsibility and we will see the work go forward.

## REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The problem of Christian Education is one of the most pressing problems facing the Baptists of North Carolina. Since we accept the New Testament as the rule of our faith and the guide to our conduct, we must believe that the command to teach is as specific and as vital as the command to preach. Unless we have leaders who have been taught and trained, we know that our denomination cannot continue to grow and to accomplish that noble purpose to which it is and ought to be consecrated and devoted. And we cannot and ought not to expect others to train our leaders for us.

There are certain facts which cannot be disputed and which we must face :

1. Our Baptist schools are rapidly being out-classed in equipment and support.

2. Our convention is carrying a heavy debt which is drawing interest and which was largely incurred in the rebuilding of Meredith College.

3. On account of the economic depression and other reasons, The Centennial Campaign has fallen far short of expectations.

4. Decreasing contributions to the Co-operative Program mean less money for Christian Education.

Our duty in certain respects seems clear :

(1) The Baptist State Convention must continue to support and maintain Wake Forest and Meredith

(2) The debt on the Convention must be paid.

(3) Careful consideration must be given to the question of how many other schools the Convention can continue to support and maintain; which, if any, should be discontinued, and which, if any, should be left to be cared for by the Alumni, friends, and particular sections.

(4) The best plan to meet the financial needs involved must be marked out.

In the meantime, your committee recommends :

(1) Increased contributions to and loyal support of the Co-operative Program so long as it is the chosen plan of the denomination.

(2) Payment of pledges to the Centennial Campaign by all who are able, and pledges and their payment by all others who are so blessed that they can help in this time of testing.

(3) Prayerful aid on the part of our people for those who are trying to solve the problems which face us.

(4) Loyalty in word and in deed on the part of Baptists toward

## Baptist Schools

(5) Active interest of both preachers and lay members in all the training activities of the Church.

## ORPHANAGE

Of all the subjects of earth that appeal to human sympathy and Christian love, none come so near being universal perhaps, as that of an orphan child. To be fatherless and motherless in childhood means that a living soul must depend upon the love, help and sympathy of others. The Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville is an organization of the Baptist people of North Carolina for the purpose of mobilizing and making effective the force of our denomination to the end that orphan children throughout the state shall be properly cared for under Christian influence. Baptist people were the leaders in North Carolina in the establishment of a home for orphan children. We are now about \$40,000 in debt. We recommend the once a-month offering in the Sunday schools and the Thanksgiving offering to meet the call. We believe that man owes no higher duty to God and to society than the duty of service to childhood without father or mother. Number of children cared for last year 685.

#### REPORT ON PASTORAL SUPPORT

Above all men, the public expects a preacher to pay his debts. How can he pay them unless we pay him? There is the butcher, baker and candlestick maker for him to pay and all the other expenses that go along with living and preaching the gospel. If our pastors do their best work for our churches, they have little or no time to devote to any other remunerative work. What are we as Baptists going to do about it?

The statistics show that Ashe County Baptists pay their pastors about an average of \$1.00 each per year. Of course, some pay a great deal more and many do not pay one penny. But if that is all that Ashe County Baptists are willing to put into preaching the gospel in our midst, we cannot expect our denomination to go forward very far and we cannot expect these faithful and earnest pastors to adequately meet the tremendous responsibilities of an active and progressive age.

Practically every church in Ashe County by making the every

member canvass and by presenting the facts can double next year what it paid its pastor this year. Perhaps all of them ought to double last year's salary and many should go beyond that. A few must lead. Will our laymen who attend this association lead in this? If we will pay our pastors, they will have their worried minds and over-worked bodies and their burdened hearts released to devote to the promotion of our denominational causes and to the building up of the Kingdom of our Lord and His Christ and next year's reports will make us proud and angels glad.

### OLD MINISTERS' RELIEF

The Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is the only agency that administers aid for the support of our aged ministers.

During the last conventional year this Board aided 663 aged ministers, 525 ministers' widows and 150 dependent children in the entire South.

During this same year, this Board aided 68 aged ministers and 67 ministers' widows, all in North Carolina.



This aid is not charity, but a long-standing obligation to these aged veterans of the cross for services rendered by them to the South and the world.

All in all, they have preached 2500 years and baptized 50,000 professed believers. During all these years, these aged ministers have answered God's call for service regardless of salary or sacrifice.

The average monthly allotment to men is \$10.14. The average monthly allotment to women is \$9.69.

These amounts are small indeed, but are greatly appreciated by these beneficiaries.

We should not neglect this feature of our work.

### SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The Sunday school is an organization that proves the activities of the church. It is one of the most vital agencies of the church which furnish spiritual, mental and social growth for each member.

It develops an insight into the light and understanding of the teaching of God's Word

It is critical to know that less than one-third of the Baptists in Ashe county attend Sunday school. This shows how inactive the churches are. It is no wonder that our Baptists are slow to understand the mission that Jesus taught in his Word, for those who do not attend Sunday school hardly ever read the Bible.

If you should visit the public school on Friday and the church on Sunday you would find less than one-third the number of children in Sunday school that you found in the public school.

This should forcibly remind us of the words of our Master who said: "Suffer little children to come unto me and forbid them not, for such is the Kingdom of heaven."

If we, as citizens, desire to keep the youth and young men out of the jails, reform schools and penitentiaries, let us get up as early on Sunday morning as we do on Monday morning and take our children to Sunday school where they can be given that spiritual training and development that our Master intended for them to have.

If that were done all over the United States there would be no need of searching the mountains for stills and bootleggers, for the coming generation would have higher ideals and greater appreciation of the good and noble things than to stoop to such low conduct, for more than 90% of all the criminals are those who never attend Sunday school.

We earnestly urge that all the pastors do everything in their power to get every member of the church to attend Sunday school every Sunday and bring the children with them.— David Harless.

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### Objects

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of

the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

#### Membership

Article 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

#### Organization

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer in such a way as the Association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

#### Duties of Officers

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

#### Time and Place

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

#### Appointments

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. The Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

#### Order of Religious Exercises

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon

by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

#### Prerogatives

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

#### Constitution—How Amended

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

---

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1st We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd We believe that the Bible, the New and Old Testaments, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3d We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgement.

9th We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

## RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.
4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.
5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.
6. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

There is nothing so vital to the interest of community and home life as the young life, even from infancy to maturity. There is nothing that gets so near the heart of man as the needs of our youth. The great desire of all parents is to live to see their children reach the age of maturity and be established in the faith of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, but so many are deprived of this privilege, passing out of this life only to leave the burden of their hearts to be carried by some one else. Let us try to fulfill the Scripture which says, "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ" and there is no better way to do this than to support and maintain our Baptist institution at Thomasville, erected for the purpose which

at present is caring for 900 of these orphan children. This institution is using every available means for the development, physical, mental and spiritual welfare of those in their care. Although our contributions are falling off debt is piling up, children with neither father nor mother, helpless widows and their children are being hopelessly turned away for lack of room and money. Every Sunday school should contribute at least once a month and save the situation. More than one half the S. S. are sending no contribution at all. We recommend that every S. S. take a collection once a month and forward to R. D. Covington, Thomasville, N. C., also, that a special Thanksgiving offering be made, which should be the greatest collection of the year and the hope of saving from crushing debt.

### SUNDAY SCHOOLS 1931

The Sunday school is one of the greatest factors in the spiritual life of the churches that we have, and yet one of the most neglected phases of our work, by the majority of our church membership. I sometimes wonder at this neglect on the part of so many, when all will have to admit that this is the most important of our work, especially our young people.

I notice that out of a church membership of 3,245, that there is a Sunday school enrollment of 2,202. Deducting the children who are not enrolled as church members, we find that more than two-thirds of our members are not in Sunday school.

The Sunday school is a training camp for the rising generations, for God's service and glory. The minds of children are capable of spiritual cultivation so soon as they can understand. They may be taught, and there is no better place, (aside from the Christian home training) than the Sunday school to teach them those virtues and graces which constitute Christian piety.

The Word teaches us to "train up a child in the way it should go and when it is old, it will not depart from it."

Now if we desire their salvation in early youth, we must begin in early youth to plant in their hearts the good seed, which is the word of God.

We recommend that every means be employed faithfully, prayerfully, and perseveringly, and then God will not condemn us, and our conscience will be clear when we meet them at the judgement bar of God.

### OLD MINISTERS' RELIEF

The Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is the only agency that administers aid for the support of our aged ministers.

During the last conventional year this Board aided 691 aged min-

isters, 603 ministers' widows and 150 depeudent children in the entire South. During this same year, this Board aided 70 aged ministers and 59 ministers' widows, all in North Carolina.

This aid is not charity, but a long-standing obligation to these aged veterans of the cross for services rendered by them to the South and the world.

All in all, they have preached 2500 years and baptized 50,000 professed believers. During all these years, these aged ministers have answered God's call for service regardless of salary or sacrifice.

The average monthly alotment to men is \$10 14. The average monthly alotment to women is \$9.69. These amounts are small, but greatly appreciated by the beneficiaries. We should not neglect this feature of our work.

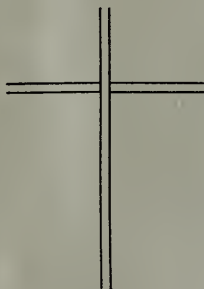

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the pro-

### MILLS HOME

In the fall of 1930 your committee had the privilege and opportunity of spending one half day and one night at Mills Home.

This is a great institution and our Baptist people should be proud of it. This Home was founded by J. H. Mills in 1885 and continued to be its leader until 1895 when J. B. Boone became his successor and held this important place until 1905; and then the beloved M. L. Kester became his successor, who on the 20th of August, 1932, was killed at Thomasville, N. C. in an automobile and train wreck, after having served honorably as Superintendent for 27 years. The orphan children of North Carolina have lost their best friend, and the Ashe Association, as well as all of the Associations in North Carolina, mourn his death.

The needs of both Mills and Kennedy Home are great. About 900 orphan children are fed, clothed, taught to work and given a Christian education at this institution.

Bretheren of the Ashe Association, stand by the Orphanage in caring for the unfortunate children of N. C. First, by observing the once-a-month offering in our Sunday schools. Second, by taking a special offering in each church on Thanksgiving day. Third, that churches send this institution loads of vegetables when possible. Fourth, that each Christian in our churches pray for this great institution and labor for enlargement.

### FOREIGN MISSIONS

In 1932, the Foreign Mission Board presented its eighty-seventh annual report, with a sense of deep gratitude to the bretheren for their cooperation, and to God for his blessings.

In 1906 there were 12,894 members. In 1931 there were 169,311. The debt on the Foreign Mission Board has been reduced a little since January first. The Board has included in its 1932 budget \$60,000 to be used for the reduction of these debts.

We should not forget them in days of adversity and we must not forget them when prosperity returns; for these institutions have been and are our "pillar of cloud by day and pillar of fire by night."

We recommend support of the program of our denomination and all its organized work, which includes Christian education. Our Churches will follow our own leaders but we cannot expect them to go beyond our leaders. Therefore, we should have leaders loyal to the core to the organized work of our Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. Our pastors should believe in Christian education and should preach it from their pulpits. They should seek the best possible training for themselves.

Our churches should demand pastors in harmony with the denominational program. They should encourage our pastors by responding as God has blessed them with financial support of the causes presented. We must lift up our eyes and broaden our horizon if we do not go forward, we will inevitably go backward which God forbid!

Since its opening, it has cared for more than fifteen thousand patients, regardless of their wealth or social standing. This year charity work has increased, and pay patients decreased, until it is necessary that we do something for it.

Therefore, we recommend that the churches of this association use their influence to get those who are able to pay their way to patronize our own hospital, and that churches from which charity patients are sent, raise \$1.50 per day to help bear their expenses.

### OLD MINISTERS' RELIEF

The Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is the only agency that administers aid for the support of our aged ministers.

During the last conventual year this Board aided 691 aged ministers, 603 ministers' widows and 150 dependent children in the entire South. During this same year, this Board aided 70 aged ministers and 59 ministers' widows, all in North Carolina.

This aid is not charity, but a long-standing obligation to these aged veterans of the cross for services rendered by them to the South and the world.

All in all, they have preached 2500 years and baptized 50,000 professed believers. During all these years, these aged ministers have answered God's call for service regardless of salary or sacrifice.

The average monthly allotment to men is \$10.14. The average monthly allotment to women is \$9.69. These amounts are small, but greatly appreciated by the beneficiaries. We should not neglect this feature of our work.

# CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

## Objects

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

## Membership

Article 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of this Association, and three delegates from each church, who shall bring a letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church.

## Organization

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer in such a way as the Association may direct. The last two offices may be held by the same brother.

## Duties of Officers

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

## Time and Place

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

## Appointments

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

## Order of Religious Exercises

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other

sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

## Prerogatives

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship and church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

## Constitution—How Amended

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

## ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1st. We believe in one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the New Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

## RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed till he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

## REVIEW OF J. F. FLETCHER'S "A HISTORY OF ASHE COUNTY (N. C.) AND NEW RIVER (VA.) BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONS

BY IRA T. JOHNSTON

Rev. J. F. Fletcher, who has labored as a Minister and Missionary in the Baptist churches of Ashe county, North Carolina, and Grayson county, Virginia, for more than half a century, has written a history recounting the origin and development of the Baptist Associations in this section which should some day find its way into every Baptist home and library in Northwest North Carolina and Southwest Virginia. This history, based upon personal recollection, painstaking investigation, and persistent recurrence to the original sources of information, contains a wealth of material sources of information, contains a wealth of material not available anywhere else. Should it not be published and preserved, there will be lost in the mists of the receding years the brilliance of a glorious past out of which has sprung the denominational development of the most numerous religious sect in this section.

Across the pages of this manuscript march Baptist pioneers and heroes, such as George McNeill, Drury Senter, Enoch Reeves, Aaron Johnston, Richard Gentry, Richard Jacks, James Eller, J. J. L. Sherwood, T. M. Duncan, Elihu Tucker, P. H. Haire, and a host of others. In stirring phrases, there is presented a panoramic glimpse of their toils and labors which have led over winding trails to the present position occupied by our great denomination in these mountains.

I consider that interest in this history should not be confined to Baptists. Leaders of other denominations can learn from its pages much about the early religious history of this section; and even secular readers will be thrilled by its moving picture of a great people on their highway of destiny. Momentous events in the life of Ashe, Alleghany, Wilkes, and Grayson counties are interwoven in the thrilling narrative of a church grappling with its problems, often divided by moral or political issues such as temperance and slavery, split by the sword of fratricidal strife and by honest and deep-seated differences over methods and missions.

Primitive Baptists, Union Baptists, Missionary Baptists will alike find an unbiased story of the soil in which they took root, written by a great Missionary with a mind unclouded by prejudice, a vivid memory of men and events, and a deep love for God and his fellowmen and the locality which gave him birth and to whom he has devoted his life.

I hope the work may be published while he lives and that a keen interest in it on the part of those with whom and among whom he has labored so faithfully through the years may shed some rays of brightness at the even-tide. He modestly says, "I believe it will be helpful. I have had access to records that few have seen and have been privileged to labor for well over fifty years, shoulder to shoulder with the men and women who have made Baptist history in these mountain counties...I have done the best I could...For this history I claim no great literary merit but I believe it to be accurate. I know that I have garnered from hundreds of obscure sources, all unknown to the average historian, many fragments of history that might have been lost but for my humble efforts and if the completed story, as it is set down here, proves interesting to those who love the Baptist cause and helpful to students and historians of the future, my labor will not have been in vain."

I want to express the hope that our people will see to it that this history is published. Naturally the Author can not afford the financial venture of under-writing the cost of publication. Can we not formulate some plan to insure the publishing and preserving of this truly monumental labor of love?

## REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Great Commission to the Disciples was to go into all parts of the world and teach all men to observe the things which they had learned from the lips of the Master.

This command has lost nothing of its challenge through the centuries and the time has come when our beloved denomination should worthily assume its world task as a teaching denomination. Let us remember that the very foundation stone of Christian Education is laid in the home, and we cannot begin too early to instruct our children by word and deed in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

To the churches falls the task of teaching its members that the home should be surrounded with a real abiding influence. From homes where family prayer is a daily custom come some of our finest young people, with the desire already planted in their hearts for a well-rounded Christian Education.

Baptists have invested large sums of money in schools throughout the Southland, and our denominational colleges rank the highest. These denominational schools, under consecrated Christian leadership, are teaching the students the necessity for real Christian Ideals and the faith so needed to carry them through the changing conditions as we find them today. Without religion and right-thinking our civilization is doomed.

## REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

The fact that about half of all church members in North Carolina are members of Baptist churches is due in large measure to the fact that for one hundred years the Baptist State Convention has pursued an aggressive State Mission Program. During all the years Baptists have used the agency of State Missions to preach the Gospel to the poor. And in the course of the years this policy has produced rich dividends which can be counted, to say nothing of those spiritual values which have been created and which it is impossible to measure. The poor do not always remain poor, and last year a church in North Carolina which at one time was aided by the State Mission Board gave as much to the support of all objects, State, South-wide, and world wide as was given by twenty-five entire associations for the same objects.

It has ever been the policy of the Board to aid not only struggling churches but also those churches in strategic centers where the local congregation is unable for a time to provide the type of ministerial service which is needed. This policy should be continued. However, due to a scarcity of funds during the past year, only about one-third as many churches have received aid as was the case three or four years ago.

For many years now State Missions, through the Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. Departments, has stimulated the growth of Sunday schools and the improvement of the teaching staff. During a recent week there were about 5,000 people in eighty-five churches engaged in study, the purpose of which was to produce better and greater Sunday schools. And when the story of the growth of young people's work shall be written it will read like a romance.

In recent years the Board, through its Building Evangelist, has planned and helped in the erection of scores of church houses in about every section of North Carolina, and these will remain visible monuments of a wise policy. This work is being discontinued as of October 1 of the present year. There appears hardly any need to state the reason for its discontinuance. Likewise it has been necessary to discontinue the work of stimulating cooperative and wise leadership among about a quarter of a million Negro Baptists in the state. The Board is still helping to provide guidance for the Indians who are left among us; and at Oteen the Board has some little part in providing spiritual comfort and counsel to the sick there.

Let us remember that State Mission Day in our Sunday schools and churches is set for the last Sunday in October. Let us on that day make a great free-will offering from State Missions.

## REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS FOR THE ASHE ASSOCIATION

The purpose of the Home Mission Board is to evangelize the homeland for world conquest for Christ. Home Missions are an essential part of our world program for Christ. A saved homeland holds the key to the world's salvation.

This Board is giving the gospel to the foreign speaking people, the negroes, the Indians, the Jews, the deaf mutes, the sailors of the Southland. Cuba, Panama and several West India Stations are included in this work.

Among the foreign speaking people we had last year 38 workers with 2668 conversions.

Our work among the Indians was never more encouraging than at this time. We had 21 workers with the Indians with 396 conversions. There are eight workers among the negroes. These men are giving aid and counsel to the negroes in study classes, lectures, and the distribution of literature. The negroes have ministers and workers, but for the most part they are ignorant and untrained. They need our help in securing a higher type of leadership.

The work in Cuba is encouraging notwithstanding political and economic disturbances. The president has recently been driven from the country and a new one placed in his stead. Several of the small out-stations have been closed.

There are now nine churches in Panama, eight negro and one white church. They are planning to carry the work into the interior as soon as possible among the Catholics.

There are now five hundred thousand Jews in the Southland and only a small number of them believing in Christ. Rev. Jacob Gartenhaus a converted Jew and a great worker is employed as a missionary to these people. There is a more hopeful attitude of the Jews toward the gospel of Christ. No longer do they look askance at Christians who seek to minister their spiritual needs. Neither do they hesitate to enter Christian churches as they once did, nor do they consider the missionary as their enemy. Many of them are reading the New Testament with interest and are seeking interviews in regard to becoming Christians. Much literature is being distributed among them.



The Home Board is sponsoring several schools and Good Will Centers. There are 18 workers with 491 day pupils. There were 504 conversions in these last year.

For the past few years receipts have been sadly falling off and much of the work has been necessarily curtailed. The total cash receipts last year were \$302,392.87. The Board laid its budget on a basis of \$266,000 and the remainder was applied to the back debts which have been hanging like a pall over the work for several years. During last year \$89,357 were paid on the debt. The Board is working within its income regardless of how it hurts. This is the only way to avoid debt and maintain the credit of the denomination as a whole.

Let us pray that the work may take an upward trend now the depression is loosening its grip on the country.

## REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSIONS

There are two things about Foreign Missions in which all of us are very much interested: How well is the cause being supported by the church here at home, and how well is the work prospering in the foreign field?

The story of how the churches have been supporting the Foreign Mission cause is not a thrilling one. This failure of ours is only a demonstration of our failure, and not God's.

The appropriations by our Foreign Mission Board for the year 1933 are about three-fourths as large as they were for the budget of 1932, which means that our budget for the present year is about twenty-five per cent lower than it was last year.

A phase of the work has been reduced drastically. We refer to the necessity of having to ask thirty missionaries to remain at home who were on furlough. The Board was unable to return the missionaries to the field. This only one of the phases from which our Board is suffering. Our debt situation is very serious. We are paying \$63,000 this year, for interest on borrowed money. Our debt on the first of January 1933 was \$1,115,177.17. We have been able to reduce the debt about \$30,000 during the year 1932. We haven't increased the debt any, but on the other hand have lowered it a little during the past year. Until this debt burden is lifted from the Board it can not hope to make progress.

We are glad to report that during the last year there were 17,284 baptisms. This is 691 more than we reported a year ago, the largest number of baptisms we have ever reported in any one year.

We now have 192,078 church members gathered into 2,698 churches. Of these churches 1,956 are self-supporting. Besides these churches we have 2,352 outstations, where the Gospel is preached, and that may be developed into churches some day.

The church members gave last year \$354,251, which is more than all the churches in the Southern Baptist Convention gave to the Foreign Mission Board 25 years ago. The number of our schools has been greatly reduced due to the falling off of our income. We still have 277 schools in which were gathered 18,789 students last year. Of these schools there were nine training schools for women in which 269 students studied. There were fifteen theological training schools in which there were 315 students. These schools are our training base for intelligent distribution of the Gospel.

Our Heavenly Father has taken us into partnership with him in the matter of carrying the Gospel to the lost all over the world. From the facts disclosed in this report, I fear we are not as heroic in this fellowship as our favored opportunity warrants.

It is a shame that the organ of our Baptist State Convention must live on advertising that decent dailies and secular publications spurn.

Our people have been hard hit by the depression, too. But most of us Baptists waste far more in a year and spend far more on non-essentials than the cost of a year's subscription to the Biblical Recorder.

We can say once more that the Recorder is a worthy paper; that Mr. Farmer is carrying on in a great way in the place once graced by J. W. Bailey, Hight C. Moore and Livingston Johnson; that one must have the Recorder to be a well informed Baptist. Let us add that as pastors and laymen, we will prove this year that we mean it or let us quit adopting reports that praise a paper we do nothing to help support.

### REPORT ON HOSPITAL

About eleven years ago our North Carolina Baptist Hospital was but a shell, unfinished and unfurnished. Today it is a modern hospital, including a fine nurses' home, rendering a great ministry of healing and life to thousands of our needy sick. Over 21,000 patients have been cared for in these years and over 9,000 have been helped financially.

An ever-increasing number of charity patients are continually knocking at the door of this great institution of healing for free relief from pain and death. To meet this need under the soul-trying conditions of recent years, has been a tremendous burden. To answer this call our Hospital has cut salaries, curtailed expenses and economized in every way possible and yet many cases of real need and suffering cannot be cared for because of lack of funds.

It is the Christian duty of every Baptist church in North Carolina to help in this emergency. It is the noblest opportunity that can be offered our people to obey our Lord's command when he said "Heal the Sick."

The Hospital asks us to meet this duty by making through our Sunday schools a liberal offering on

Mother's Day and by sending with each charity patient \$1.50 per day for the time such a person is cared for.

We should show our appreciation of the North Carolina Baptist Hospital by responding liberally to this request.

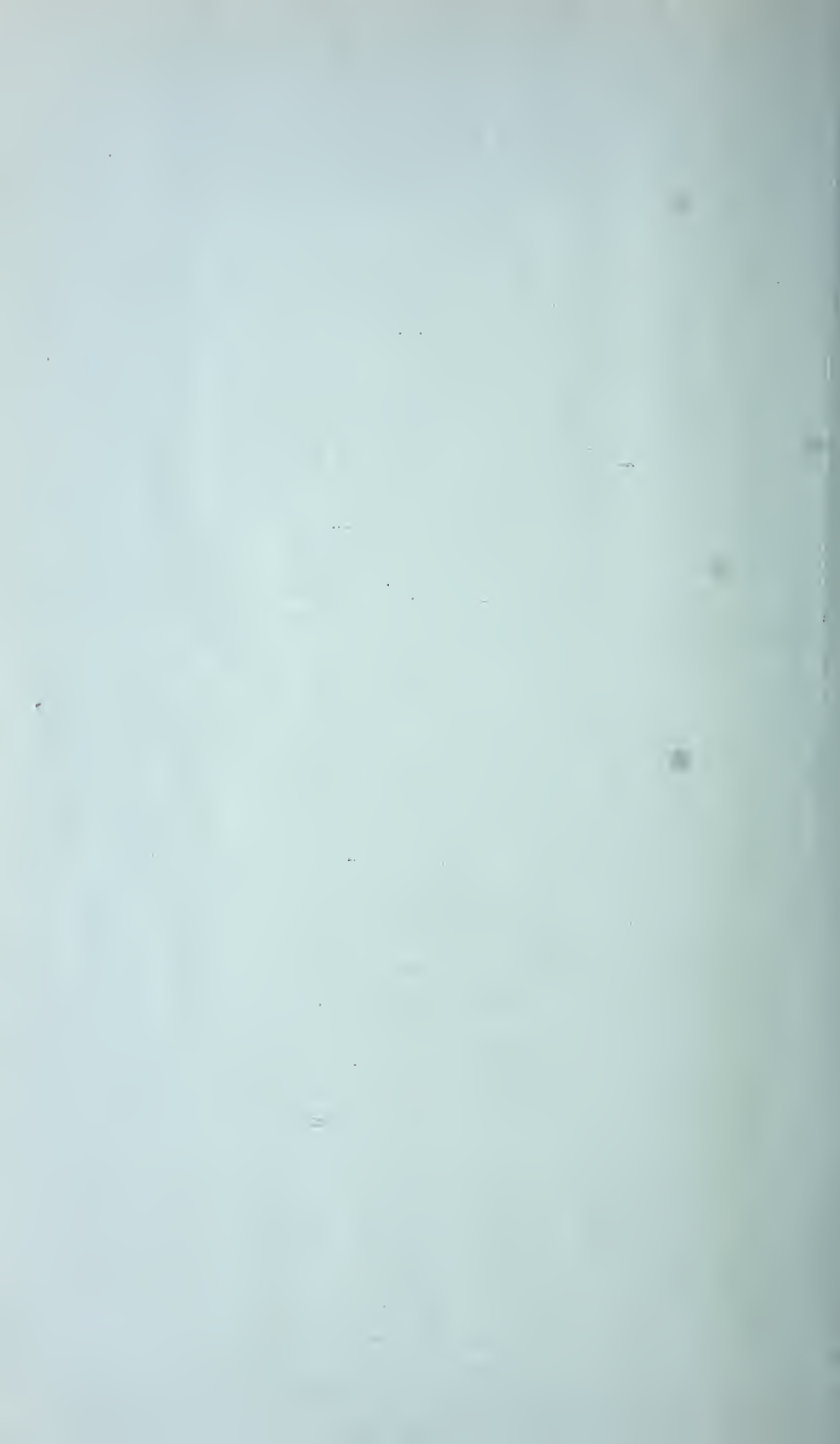

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### Objects

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

### Membership

Article 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of the Association, and three delegates from each church. A letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church shall be sent to the Clerk at least fifteen days before the opening of the session.

### Organization

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator and a Clerk and Treasurer. This election shall take place hereafter at the end of each session, and those elected shall serve through the next session.

### Duties of Officers

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

### Time and Place

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

### Appointments

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Mission, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

### Order of Religious Exercises

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

### **Prerogatives**

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

### **Constitution—How Amended**

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

### **Abstract of Principles**

1st. We believe in one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the New Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

### **Rules of Order**

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed until he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

## REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

"Thus it is written, that Christ should suffer, and rise again from the dead the third day; and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name unto all nations, beginning from Jerusalem." Thus spoke Jesus on the Day of the Ascension to the 120. In our work of Home Missions we are endeavoring to accomplish this very thing and win those to Christ who come to us from across the seas, the foreign-speaking people, the Indians, whom the white man found upon coming to America, the Negroes who were introduced to America in the bondage of human slavery. Truly the favor of God has rested upon the labors of our faithful missionaries. They report 1,701 baptisms and 1,096 other conversions, making a total of 2,797 went to Christ in the last year.

Our Home Mission work among the foreign-speaking people is divided into two general fields. First, the work among people born in other lands, the Mexicans, the Italians, Cubans in the United States, European peoples in Southern Illinois and our larger cities, and the Chinese. Second, work among native American peoples speaking a language other than English, chiefly the French of Southern Louisiana and the Spanish Americans of New Mexico. These are fields of great magnitude. The fruits of the year's work are inspiring.

The work in Cuba has been active and aggressive during most of the year in all of the churches. While the present extent of the mission field in Panama is the Canal Zone and the two terminal cities with immediate surrounding territory.

Among the Jews we have but one missionary, Jacob Gartenhaus, a son of "Jacob" himself. During the past year he tells us that he has been faced with unlimited opportunities for the presentation of the message of life, hope, and salvation through the Messiah to His people. There is a great contrast today in his work when compared with it in the beginning. At first the doors were shut and their hearts steeled against the message. To them the missionary was an imposter, a traitor to the faith; now they address him as "friend" and "brother," whereas in the past it

was a rare thing to see Jewish people at his services. It would be difficult to estimate in actual figures the number of conversions. At the start it was a very rare thing to hear of Jewish conversions, but now scarcely a week passes without the news coming from the remote corners of our territory of some Israelite who has found his Saviour, and their number will increase as Christian people reach out a saving hand to them.

## REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

How well this has been done must be viewed in the light of the not more than 7,680 Baptists—white and black—who believed in progress and missions a hundred and four years ago and the nearly 450,000 white Baptist today alone represented in our State Convention. We must remember, however, that "there remaineth yet very much land to be possessed." More than 750,000 of Gospel age within the borders of our state who are not affiliated with any church and over 10,000 of these within our own association. This is a Baptist responsibility that we Baptists dare not shirk save at our own peril.

The message which Jesus sent to John the Baptist while the latter was in prison was significant. John was in doubt about the Messiahship of Jesus. In his distress he sent a message to Jesus: "Art Thou He that should come, or look we for another?" In reply Jesus did not argue, but rather directed John's disciples to say to him: "Tell John what things ye have seen and heard, how that the blind see, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, to the poor the Gospel is preached."

For these more than one hundred years the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, through the agency of State Missions, has been attempting to preach the Gospel to the poor. Hundreds of churches, while in their infancy and so unable to support themselves, have been aided by the State Mission Board, and even now 126 churches are being helped with a budget reduced to about one-third of what it was a few years ago. In a changing state all our churches must become more vital in the life of our people. They must be the power houses from which radiate influences that will touch every phase of our common life. The power of a church to actually influence its members is in most instances in direct ratio to its interest in and support of Missions. A church that cannot vision its task at a distance is not likely to vision its task in its own community. All of the objects which we cherish and support are indebted to the foundations laid in years ago by State Missions. We need a revival, a revitalization of the church membership in all of our churches in Spiritual Living and Scriptural Giving.

In addition to "preaching the Gospel to the poor," State Missions maintains a Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. Department second to none, it is believed, in the whole South. Moreover, a chaplain, Rev. Wayne W. Williams, is being supported at Oteen; and since the Home Mission Board, due to financial conditions, has found it necessary to curtail work among the Indians, State Missions are now supporting entirely the work among the Indians in Polk and Swain counties. We must, at the earliest moment possible, undertake some work among our Negro Baptists.

We owe less today on State Missions than we have in years. If we can get a worthy offering this fall we will come to the end of the year without any debt on State Missions.

But we must go forward. The needs are pressing. There are at least fifty groups of churches in real need of assistance. There are other urgent needs, but all these needs must wait upon our generosity. Let us, therefore, out of gratitude to God for His innumerable blessings and in view of these challenging opportunities, make a great offering this fall in all of our churches for State Missions.

If faith without works is dead, most of our churches are dead so far as any missionary spirit is concerned.

What proportion of our Churches made any contribution to Foreign Missions last year? What proportion of our Church members made any contribution to Foreign Missions last year or ever



made any contribution to this cause? Perhaps an answer would stamp most of us as anti-missionary in practice if not in belief. Should we not be honest about this thing? We can not honestly claim to believe what we do not practice.

Perhaps we all ought to take at least some small part in missions or take the word "Missionary" from our Mast-head. As to what our part shall be, are we willing for Him to judge who said "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature"? We must either accept Him or deny Him.

## REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The history of education in all countries, in all ages, and among all peoples, reveals the fact that the Church or some other religious order has been responsible for the introduction and maintenance of a system of education. Hence, all education one time was Christian education. The first schools of which there remains any records were connected with the Temple. The priests and scribes were the teachers. Until very late in our history, education in the United States was entirely in the hands of the various religious organizations. Governor Aycock, J. Y. Joyner, and others of our own time saw the completion of a state school system in North Carolina. For many years after state systems were set up religion, honest citizenship, and various other virtues were emphasized not only in the schools but at home as well.

The speed with which a new era dawned upon us wrought many changes in our views as to the purpose of education. Ways of making a good living without work, get-rich-quick theories, and many other unhealthy notions were over emphasized by parents and teachers, and as a result, the curriculum was changed to meet what we thought the needs of pupils in a new economic era. Many of these changes were needed and went a long way in adding to the comforts and conveniences of life, but we have drifted too far and have over emphasized the dollar at the cost of honor and self-respect.

The task of giving Christian Education to the American youth is a stupendous task; were Southern Baptists compelled to provide for all the youth of their constituency, they would have to increase the schools and equipment much beyond their present holdings. Hence, no religious body can hope to provide a system of education sufficient for the youth of America or even all the youth of their own constituency.

But there are two things that can be done. We can work for better state schools in which the students are taught to believe greatly in a divine pre-determined plan for their lives, the duty and necessity to think and work for themselves and to do the will and work of the Divine One. Second, we can strive to see that the leaders of our churches and our Kingdom work are educated in Christian schools.

Southern Baptists have about ninety-seven schools and colleges in the south. Eleven of these are in North Carolina. Many of these are struggling with debt, others need money for new and better equipment.

We recommend that Baptists, so far as possible, patronize Baptist Colleges and schools, that tuition, gifts and free-will offerings be solicited occasionally for our denominational schools, and that we lead the field in a movement away from Atheism and other things that confuse the minds of the American youth.

While we have not given as we might have Mr. Covington's report of the operating expenses of the Mills Home for the last year shows a balance on the credit side of more than \$12,000. This report shows that we gave generously of our fruits and other products of the mountains.

Mr. Lovelace's report shows that there were 488 children enrolled in the different departments of the school during the year.

The report of Miss Hattie Edwards, Case Worker of the Mills Home shows that there were 1019 children cared for during the year.

Another report to the superintendent shows that there was not a child sent to the Home from our Association.

## REPORT ON HOSPITAL

Through these years of depression and suffering our Hospital has rendered a magnificent service to our needy sick, answering every call and giving life and health to thousands who had no means, and would have suffered or perhaps died had they not found help in our institution.

The Hospital has cared for over ten thousand charity patients and part pay patients, in the ten years of its ministry, and this year (1934) the number will reach more than two thousand.

The Mothers' Day offering which amounts to about \$11,500.00 and the Duke endowment amounting to about \$9,000.00 or a total of \$20,500.00 is not sufficient to pay for \$45,000.00 worth of charity work. It just can't be done.

The Hospital will have to cut down on charity work or receive larger support if they are to care for the ever increasing number of charity and part pay patients which are daily applying for admittance.

Helping folks to get well is the job of the Hospital. But in order to do this the institution must have the whole-hearted support of the churches.

The Hospital has asked our churches sending free patients to raise the sum of \$1.50 per day to supplement the mothers day

offering in the care of their patients, if this is done the Hospital will be able to carry on in its great ministry of healing.

Therefore we recommend that the pastors and delegates go back to their churches and see that this is done.

We recommend also that all the churches in the Ashe Association put on a Mothers' Day program, and make a greater effort this year in helping the needy sick than ever before.

For these, our brothers and sisters for whom Jesus died. let's do it. Surely we will not fail them nor disappoint Him.

## REPORT ON PASTORAL SUPPORT

Last year there were reported in the churches of the Ashe Association three thousand, three hundred and ninety-nine (3399) members. These members paid the pastors of the Churches two thousand, two hundred twenty-one dollars and thirty cents (\$2,221.30) or an average of about sixty-five cents per member. That is barely over five cents per month. Pastors come cheap. It seems that every church member should be able to pay at least ten cents per month or one dollar and twenty cents per year.

Our pastors must live. Next year let us try to be able to make a much better report than we have made this year. If we cannot give money, perhaps there are other things that we can give. Our pastors are human beings like we are and can use anything we can use. Let us do our best, sacrifice a little and it is certain that what we sacrifice in material things the Lord will make it up to us in Spiritual gains.

Let us ask ourselves this question in all seriousness and candor, is the present lack of young men entering the Baptist Ministry due, in any way, to the meager aid give to our active ministers, and the small aid and appreciation given them when their usefulness ceases? If this be so our duty individually and collectively is plain. We read in New Testament that "God has ordained that they who preach the Gospel shall live of the Gospel."

Let us realize our duty and do it.

## REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

With the repeal of the Eighteenth Admendment and the legalizing of beer in North Carolina, the use of alcoholic drinks is increasing. Much to the gratification of our dry forces, North Carolina voted against the repeal of our dry laws by a majority of 184,000, but politicians and other forces both in and outside the state are working hard for the repeal of the Turlington Act, and unless our next legislature is composed of uncompromising dries, our State Prohibition Laws will be blotted out. The Revenue Department of the Federal Government located in Greensboro has announced that 250 Federal licenses to sell liquor have been issued in North Carolina, and this has taken place in spite of the fact that during the campaign for repeal of the Eighteenth Admendment, the Federal Government promised protection to the dry states.

Since beer was legalized, the dangers on the highways from drunken drivers have greatly increased, and Virginia, a sister state, reports that since liquor was legalized in her borders, drunken drivers have increased more than fifty percent and that bootlegging is increasing also.

Realizing that alcohol is one of the greatest evils with which our people have to contend, that it wrecks homes, takes food and clothing from innocent children, and destroys its victims physically, mentally, morally and spiritually, your committee recommends the following.

1. That the parents be urged to diligently teach their children the ruinous effects of the use of alcohol,
2. That the ministers and Sunday School teachers be appealed to for assistance in this teaching,
3. And that the Ashe Association go on record as standing firmly for the Turlington Act.

He professed faith in Christ in 1889 and joined the Presbyterian Church. Later he joined the Missionary Baptist Church and was faithful until his death.

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### OBJECTS

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

### MEMBERSHIP

Article 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of the Association, and three delegates from each church. A letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church shall be sent to the Clerk at least fifteen days before the opening of the session.

### ORGANIZATION

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator and a Clerk and Treasurer. This election shall take place hereafter at the end of each session, and those elected shall serve through the next session.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

### TIME AND PLACE

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

### APPOINTMENTS

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

### ORDER OF RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.



Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

#### PREROGATIVES

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

#### CONSTITUTION—HOW AMENDED

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

#### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1st. We believe in one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the New Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgement.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

#### RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed until he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand or leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

## REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

The purpose of State Mission is to carry the gospel to the people of our own state, "to begin first at Jerusalem." Worthy pastors of weak churches are aided. Pastors and churches at strategic points are enabled to carry on more effectively. Sunday School work and B. Y. P. U. work are encouraged.

Our history of the Ashe Association shows that many of our churches were founded and many souls redeemed through the work of State Missionaries. Take that leaf out of our history and we would lose much of the noblest and best of the past.

If we do not co-operate with our State Board, we show a shortsighted and narrow spirit, which stamps us as anti-missionary at heart and dooms our churches to failure and spiritual death. The churches that support the Co-operative Program are the churches that are alive and growing and supporting their local work decently. Almost without exception, the churches that make no contributions to denominational causes are doing nothing locally.

In spite of the most serious economic depression in history, by reducing its budget drastically, our State Mission Board has greatly reduced its debt and has carried on. North Carolina perhaps has made more progress toward prosperity than any other state. It is encouraging to note increased support for State Missions. Let us do our part in the churches of the Ashe Association and rid ourselves of the zeros that constitute so large a part of our statistical tables.

## REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

"Statistics are rarely ever impressive except to mathematicians, research workers, and statisticians themselves. Your committee does not belong to either class. Besides, any statistics which might be incorporated in this report would only emphasize our shame. Many of our churches could lay no possible claim to the name of Missionary Baptist Churches, if the divine writer was right who spoke of people showing their faith by their works. If faith without works is dead, most of our churches are dead so far as any missionary spirit is concerned. What proportion of our churches made any contribution to Foreign Missions last year?

What proportion of our Church members made any contribution to Foreign Missions last year or ever made any contribution to this cause? Perhaps an answer would stamp most of us as anti-missionary in practice if not in belief. Should we not be honest about this thing? We cannot honestly claim to believe what we do not practice.

Perhaps we all ought to take at least some small part in missions or take the word "Missionary" from our Mast-head. As to what our part shall be, are we willing for Him to judge who said "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature"? We must either accept Him or deny Him.

I shall only add that world conditions today emphasize the need of Christ in all the world. War thinking nations need to think upon the precepts of the Prince of Peace. And our people in America, emerging from economic distress, need to think of the answer to the question "Who is my neighbor?" and their duty to all mankind everywhere.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We, with all other Southern Baptists, should be proud of the educational institutions that belong to the Southern Baptist Convention. The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky. This school under Dr. John R. Sampey as president has a faculty of 17 and an enrollment of 350. More than 3000 of its former students are now pastors in the U. S. In connection with the Seminary is the W. M. U. Training School with Miss Carrie Littlejohn as president, and a student body of 72. At Ft. Worth, Texas is the Southwestern Theological Seminary. Here Dr. L. R. Scarborough is the president. There is a faculty of 16 and 339 students enrolled. At New Orleans, La. Dr. W. W. Hamilton is president of the Baptist Bible Institute, with eight members of the faculty and 190 students. These schools are preparing to fill places of usefulness in our own Southland and in the world.

North Carolina Baptists own eight schools and colleges, Campbell, Wingate, Boiling Springs, Wake Forest, Meridith, Mars Hill, Chowan, and Fruitland. These schools now have an enrollment of more than 2500 college students and about 300 high school students. The total value of all property and endowments of these schools is \$8,749,484.

These schools mean much to the work of the kingdom. They deserve our prayers, and our loyal support.

As great as these schools are they can reach only a small part of our people. What are we to do for those boys and girls who will never go to a college or a seminary? The duty of educating these for the kingdom rests on the home and the church. If these two fail then many of our young people will fail to receive a Christian education. Let the home furnish the old fashioned Christian training, then let the church supplant the work begun in the home.

Today the government recognizes its responsibility in caring for the education of adult illiterates. The church might learn from the government that it too has a responsibility and an opportunity to do a worthwhile thing in training our older people. We all need to take Paul's advice to Timothy when he said, "Study to show yourselves approved unto God workmen

that needeth not be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." Timothy was a grown young man. Yet he needed to learn. Many of us need to learn: something of God's plan for our lives, the need of the world for mission, how to win souls for the kingdom, and how to be better stewards of the Master.

## REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITAL

In our efforts to carry out the commission of Jesus to heal the sick we have:

Since the opening of the Hospital May 28, 1923 to July 15, 1935, 29,000 patients have entered for treatment. In the first half of the year 1935, 1,760 have been treated. At this rate, the Hospital will have 3,520 patients this year, or 31,260 patient days. Of this, 11,886 will be full pay, 9,704 part pay and 9,674 free.

The Hospital has had an average of 86 patients per day for the last six months and is now averaging 300 per month. Almost one-half of patient days are service or free days.

The Woman's Missionary Unions of the State, in addition to their cash contributions, have sent to the Hospital during the first six months of this year 3,635 articles of linen, consisting of sheets, spreads, pillow cases, towels, etc. These are much needed and much appreciated.

Mother's Day (the second Sunday in May) has been designated by the denomination as "Hospital Day." If only all of our churches would seriously put on a well-planned Mother's Day program, enough money could be provided to amply care for this vast host of God's poor, who can't provide this service for themselves. We are trying to carry on the same program that Jesus gave so much of His life to relieving suffering humanity. What part have you played in it? What will you have?

## REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

This question of temperance has been one of importance every since the time of Noah, but today it is calling for whole hearted Christians who are not afraid to stand firm against legalizing liquor. Will liquor bearing the seal of our government lose its evil effects upon those who drink it.

Cale Burgess answers this question with an emphatic "No". He says that legalized liquor will make our boys and girls drunk. He goes on to say that during national prohibition, 87 of the 98 Keely Institutes in the United States closed their doors. Since repeal, Keely Institute patients have increased 55 per cent.

Recently the Christian Science Monitor reported the Virginia liquor system to be "an utter failure and tending to encourage women and girls of all classes to drink, and that "since the system became effective there has been increased drunkenness, drunken driving, more arrests for disorderly conduct and that desecration of the Sabbath has become more common.

Attorney General Cummings of the United States stated recently that convictions for liquor law violations are increasing rapidly and threaten to over crowd Federal prisons, adding that such convictions had "nearly doubled" in the last year." It is liquor and not prohibition that causes injury and trouble and fills the hospitals and jails.

Cale Burgess writes again that the Virginia liquor stores and the county liquor stores in eastern North Carolina are nearly modern editions of the old dispensary system that we tried and found unsatisfactory more than a generation ago. And they will not improve our situation but will increase drinking and drunkenness and every other injury and vice that always accompanies liquor traffic.

Huntington, W. Va. boasted that the first customer to its liquor store was a woman. 15 to 20 per cent of the buyers of liquor in Virginia are women.

Evangline Booth of the Salvation Army says, "Drink has drained more blood, hung more crepe, sold more homes, plunged more people into bankruptcy, armed more villains slain more children, snapped more wedding rings, defiled more innocence, blinded more eyes, dethroned more reasons, wrecked more manhood, dishonored more womanhood, broken more hearts, blasted more lives, driven more to suicide, and dug more graves than any other scourge that ever swept its death-dealing waves across the world."

In the light of these facts we, as true disciples of Christ, should pledge ourselves anew to follow the example set by Daniel, thus doing our share in keeping our state from rushing blindly into an act that will mean destruction of our boys and girls.

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### OBJECTS

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

### MEMBERSHIP

Article 3. The members of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of the Association, and three delegates from each church. A letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church shall be sent to the Clerk at least fifteen days before the opening of the session.

### ORGANIZATION

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator and a Clerk and Treasurer. This election shall take place hereafter at the end of each session, and those elected shall serve through the next session.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

### TIME AND PLACE

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

### APPOINTMENTS

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest of Church Letters, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

### ORDER OF RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

#### PRERROGATIVES

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

#### CONSTITUTION—HOW AMENDED

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

#### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1st. We believe in one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the New Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgement.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

#### RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed until he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

We, the messengers to the Ashe Association assembled at Mission Home Church at Fleetwood, N. C. on August 30, 1936, reaffirm our conviction that dancing keeps those who engage in it from "reproducing the character of Christ" and thus deadens the Christian influence of our churches, home, and denomination. Under this conviction we petition the board of trustees of Wake Forest College to rescind their action in permitting dancing at Wake Forest College for the following reasons:

1. The effect that this permission to dance would have upon the young people in our homes. The influence and example of our college students in the home and community in which they reside often determines the social standards, and where dancing is permitted and engaged in by our Baptist students while in college their influence back home is worldly, if not positively destructive of Christian ideals.

2. The effect upon our churches for our denominational schools to sanction by supervising what is a worldly pleasure would neutralize the influence of our churches so that they would follow the example of our denominational colleges and permit dancing in the social rooms of our churches, as is the case in some Baptist churches today.

3. The effect it would have upon the confidence of our church members in our denominational program. If dancing is permitted at Wake Forest College which is considered a part of the Baptist work the people will not only lose confidence in the college but in our Cooperative Program, and would withdraw their support from all our work.

## REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Home Missions in the denomination as a whole is taking the Gospel in all its fullness, to the people of the homeland, Cuba, and Panama.

Our Home Mission board defines its tasks as: First, the preaching of the gospel to those who have it not in the isolated section, and neglected places outside the normal reaches of the churches; Second, any and all of the missionary and evangelistic tasks in the homeland which require the impact of the whole denomination for their solution, and can therefore best be handled by a southwide agency.

The activities of our Mission board are guaranteed by an honorable agreement with our creditors.

There are about 250 missionaries and workers in the sanatoriums, schools, and good will centers. There are 598 mission stations, maintained, five goodwill centers, two rescue stations, and a seaman's institute, 29 schools are operated by the Home Mission board in Panama, Cuba, and the homeland A tubercular sanitorium in El Paso, Texas is being successfully operated.

During the past year the board has conducted its ever enlarging work, without borrowing a penny for operating expenses, and has also paid off a substantial amount of its indebtedness. Last year the board placed 36 new missionaries in the field, and opened 76 new missions. Best of all there were 3,740 conversions and baptisms by the workers and missionaries sent out by the board.

Let us, as Ashe county Baptists, catch a new vision of our Home Mission work, and give new and greater support to this great work.

## REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITAL

In our efforts to carry out the commission of our Saviour to heal the sick more than 32,000 have entered our hospital at Winston-Salem for treatment since its opening in 1923. The hospital is continually growing in its service to the sick. In 1933 we had an average of about 60 patients per day, in 1936 we have had an average of more than 90 per day. Much of this service is free. In 1935 the hospital gave 12,056 days of service that were paid for in full; 10,489 part-pay days; 9,336 free days and of the part pay days, there is estimated 4,882 free days.

The hospital has to depend almost entirely on the Mother's Day offerings from the churches and Sunday Schools to provide this treatment for God's poor.

Friends of the hospital, Sunday School classes, W. M. U. and others do, and may send to the hospital bed linens, trays, towels, napkins, piece goods, or canned fruits and vegetables, which will be much appreciated.

## REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

Perhaps there is no more important matter before our people today than the temperance question. In temperance, there exists many forms. The Scriptures teach that we are to be temperate in all things. Temperance literally means self control and that means that every person should be able to regulate his own conduct in all things and every where. So anything or agency that leads our people to loose control of themselves and thus leads to degeneration and excess is to be avoided and every restraining agency that can be brought to bear on this agency is to be fostered by our people.

It is an admitted fact that there is nothing that leads people to lose self control like the use of alcohol. Hence, we are suggesting that we ask our people to refrain from the use of alcohol and to foster every agency that seeks to lessen and control the manufacture, sale and use of alcohol in all its forms. It is our profound conviction that there is nothing that so degenerates the people as the legal sale of alcohol. Therefore, we ask our people to fight every measure that seeks to bring back the legal sale of alcohol in any way whatsoever, and to stand against all men and measures who seek to do the same.

The United Dry Forces of the State are striving to educate the people against alcohol. They are speaking in the schools and churches along these lines. We ask that our people co-operate with these forces by aiding them in putting on their campaigns in the churches and schools and the communities generally. The tide against the legal sale of alcohol is rapidly turning, and now is the time to do our best in this work. We suggest that our people aid this work both with their support and their money. It will be well worth while.

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### OBJECTS

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention.

### MEMBERSHIP

Article 3. The membership of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of the Association, and three delegates from each church. A letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church shall be sent to the Clerk at least fifteen days before the opening of the session.

### ORGANIZATION

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator and a Clerk and Treasurer. This election shall take place hereafter at the end of each session, and those elected shall serve through the next session.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches, the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

### TIME AND PLACE

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

### APPOINTMENTS

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest Church Letter, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

### ORDER OF RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon, the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

#### PREROGATIVES

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

#### CONSTITUTION—HOW AMENDED

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

#### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1st. We believe in one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the New Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that the salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

#### RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed until he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

The year ending June 30, 1937, was the greatest in the history of the 14 years of ministry of the Baptist Hospital, located at Winston-Salem; greatest in number of patients admitted, in number of churches contributing to its support and greatest in amount contributed.

During the year about 5,000 patients applied for treatment. Of this number 1,000 could not be admitted for lack of room.

The nurses' Home is now being enlarged, the capacity doubled; also plans are underway to enlarge the Hospital.

During the year, 1,000 Mothers were returned home to 200,000 interested kinsmen and friends. Out of this number 60 patients from Ashe County were returned to 3,000 persons who were personally interested in their recovery.

The Hospital has a staff of 5 internes, 66 doctors, 55 nurses, and 35 student nurses. The Hospital doctors are rendering a vast amount of free service to the sick and distressed people of the state; not less than \$160,000.00 for the year.

The Hospital depends very largely on the Mothers Day offering for providing treatment to those who cannot pay. This offering last May was a little more than \$20,000.00. Hospital linen, such as sheets, pillow cases, a little more than \$20,000.00. Hospital linen, such as sheets, pillow cases, towels, etc., has been donated in increasing quantities this year by Woman's Missionary Unions and other church organizations.

The Hospital buildings and equipment are valued at \$325,000.00, but as a Christian Institution, this Hospital renders, not only to the suffering in body but to the distressed in mind and spirit, a service that cannot be estimated in dollars and cents.

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### OBJECTS

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention.

### MEMBERSHIP

Article 3. The membership of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of the Association, and three delegates from each church. A letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church shall be sent to the Clerk at least fifteen days before the opening of the session.

### ORGANIZATION

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator and Clerk and Treasurer. This election shall take place hereafter at the sitting of the association instead of at the close of the session, and those elected shall serve through the next session.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

### TIME AND PLACE

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

### APPOINTMENTS

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest Church Letter, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

### ORDER OF RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a

sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

### PREROGATIVES

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

### CONSTITUTION—HOW AMENDED

Article 14. This Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1st. We believe in one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the New Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that the salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by qualified administrators, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

### RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed until he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

For a hundred years the objective of State Missions has been to win people to Christ and then to the fellowship which the churches provide. The key word for "winning" in the New Testament is "witnessing." We understand, then, that the method of winning people, whether as individuals or whether as churches, cooperating one with another, is in witnessing to the redeeming love and power of the Lord Jesus in the individual life and in all human relationship. This is the primary task of State Missions.

We list and discuss briefly a few of the functions of the State Board of Missions:

1. **Missionary Pastoral Assistance:** "To the poor the gospel is preached" in many needy and strategic places—many of our strong churches formerly aided by the Board, are now returning to the treasury for all purposes one hundredfold. In many sections the pastors do not receive sufficient support from their churches to keep them fit for kingdom service. The Board endeavors to extend them financial aid in a limited way in order that the hungry sheep may look up and be fed.

2. **Church Building:** All through the years and even at the present, churches in strategic centers are aided in building plants that are needed.

3. **Teaching and Training:** The State Board is carrying on a Christian Educational program now with great emphasis laid upon the training of our young people for kingdom work.

4. **The Negroes:** The Baptist State Convention is now undertaking to cooperate with the work of the negro state convention by cooperation rather than to provide white workers among the negroes.

5. **Work among Students in the Colleges:** The great in-

al effects, household goods, clothes, and all the intimate personal accumulations of a lifetime. It is estimated that fifty missionaries have lost an average of \$1,000.00 each in personal property and belongings. The Foreign Mission Board has no funds whatever for reimbursing these missionaries. When the war is over in China and we come into possession of our property again the question of rebuilding and repairing is going to be acute indeed.

We feel that the present condition in the far east has created one of the greatest opportunities that has come to our people in a long time, and we hope that each and every church in our denomination will help to meet this necessary added burden in a way that will be a credit to the members of our denomination in carrying out the great commission of Christ.

### REPORT ON OLD MINISTERS' RELIEF

The Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has rendered a great service for the last twenty years in providing food, clothing and shelter for thousands of ministers who have grown old in service of our Lord and Master, and for widows of ministers who have gone to their reward.

The Board is still asking the churches to take at least one offering in connection with the Lord's Supper each year for Ministerial Relief. Ministers find it a great joy to preach about the different organizations of the church, but to present and promote the work of the relief and annuity board is too much like begging, but to the church it would be a sound idea of solving the problem that is world wide to all our churches.

Sickness and old age befall every Minister sooner or later and the church wants an active, alert pastor. It should feel a

full sense of obligation to the man who served them through the years and has suddenly become unable for further service. The average pastor has been unable to save anything for himself or his family and finds himself practically a pauper, when he stops serving churches.

Governments of many nations have recognized the liability of old age and sickness and made provisions for it.

In our country, church and state are separate and the ministers prefer not to be included in the protection by the government.

The church must meet this obligation. The financial worries about the future must be removed. A revival of religion in our churches must come with revival of preaching. How can it when the preacher is embarrassed with financial obligations for the future. These worries must be removed by the churches for the pastor. Our faithful servants ought not be turned out in their old age to starve and depend on fitful charity.

We will always have a responsibility in this matter for the work of the kingdom of God, that it be not hindered and that the dignity of his servants and his cause on earth be not dishonored.

### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The task of the Home Mission Board is to lift up Christ and make him known in the Homeland. Each generation in the Homeland must be evangelized. In this work of Christianizing the Homeland we are serving the world. A triumphant Missionary program in our country is necessary if we would push our conquest for Christ in lands afar. The board has adjusted its budget so as to operate on a cash basis. And we are gradually but surely paying our debts, and reducing the debt more than one hundred thousand dollars a year. The missionary-minded women of the South have done much to help in this work. They gave \$130,000 last year. The missionaries working in the Homeland report: 278 mission churches and 332 mission out-stations where work is carried on, 3,633 conversions and 3,136 Baptized into our mission churches.

Baptist have the money, they have the talent; above all we have the message that will save the world. And God gives us the will to perform it.

### REPORT OF PASTORAL SUPPORT

Reference to the minutes of the Ashe Association reveals the encouraging fact that in 1933, the total pastors' salaries was \$1618.65 and in 1937, \$3298.28, perhaps the largest total in the

history of the Association. We are, therefore, making progress. Yet, the last named amount seems rather meager when we scan the table which contains the names of the various pastors and find that it was divided among eighteen men who serve the more than forty churches in our Association. True, five churches made no report on this matter last year. The smallest amount reported from any church was \$6.50 and the largest amount was \$1079.92. The total amount represents almost exactly one dollar per year per member for pastors' salaries. Of course, many pay a great deal more than that and many do not pay anything. A few are not able to pay; but the great majority of our people could pay more than they are paying and not be hurt; yea, verily, they would receive a blessing.

Let us suggest that each church plan to increase the amount raised for the salary of the pastor for the next year by not less than twenty per cent. "The laborer is worthy of his hire." "Let each one of you, on the first day of the week, lay by him in store, as the Lord has blessed him."

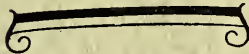

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### OBJECTS

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention.

Article 3. The membership of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of the Association, and three delegates from each church. A letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church shall be sent to the Clerk at least fifteen days before the opening of the session.

### ORGANIZATION

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator and Clerk and Treasurer. This election shall take place hereafter at the sitting of the association instead of at the close of the session, and those elected shall serve through the next session.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

### TIME AND PLACE

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

### APPOINTMENTS

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in August. At each annual session there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest Church Letter, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

### ORDER OF RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

### PREROGATIVES

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

### CONSTITUTION—HOW AMENDED

Article 14. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1st. We believe in one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the New Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that the salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by qualified administrators, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

### RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.

3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and address the Moderator, and not proceed until he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without permission of the Moderator.

6. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The major part of our teaching centers in our Sunday School. In the year 1937-38 we had a membership of 3572 in the Ashe Association. We had enrolled in our Sunday Schools 2317 persons, with an average attendance of 1347 in Sunday School each Sunday morning to study God's word. We find it took fifteen persons to win one soul to Christ in this same period.

After carefully considering these facts we invited Mr. L. L. Morgan, our State Sunday School secretary, to bring a group of special workers into our Association for a week of special Sunday School emphasis. In the eighteen churches we were able to reach we found 3,495 possibilities for Baptist Sunday Schools. At the rate we are going now we have not reached half of our possibilities for Church membership and about one third of our possibilities for Sunday School work.

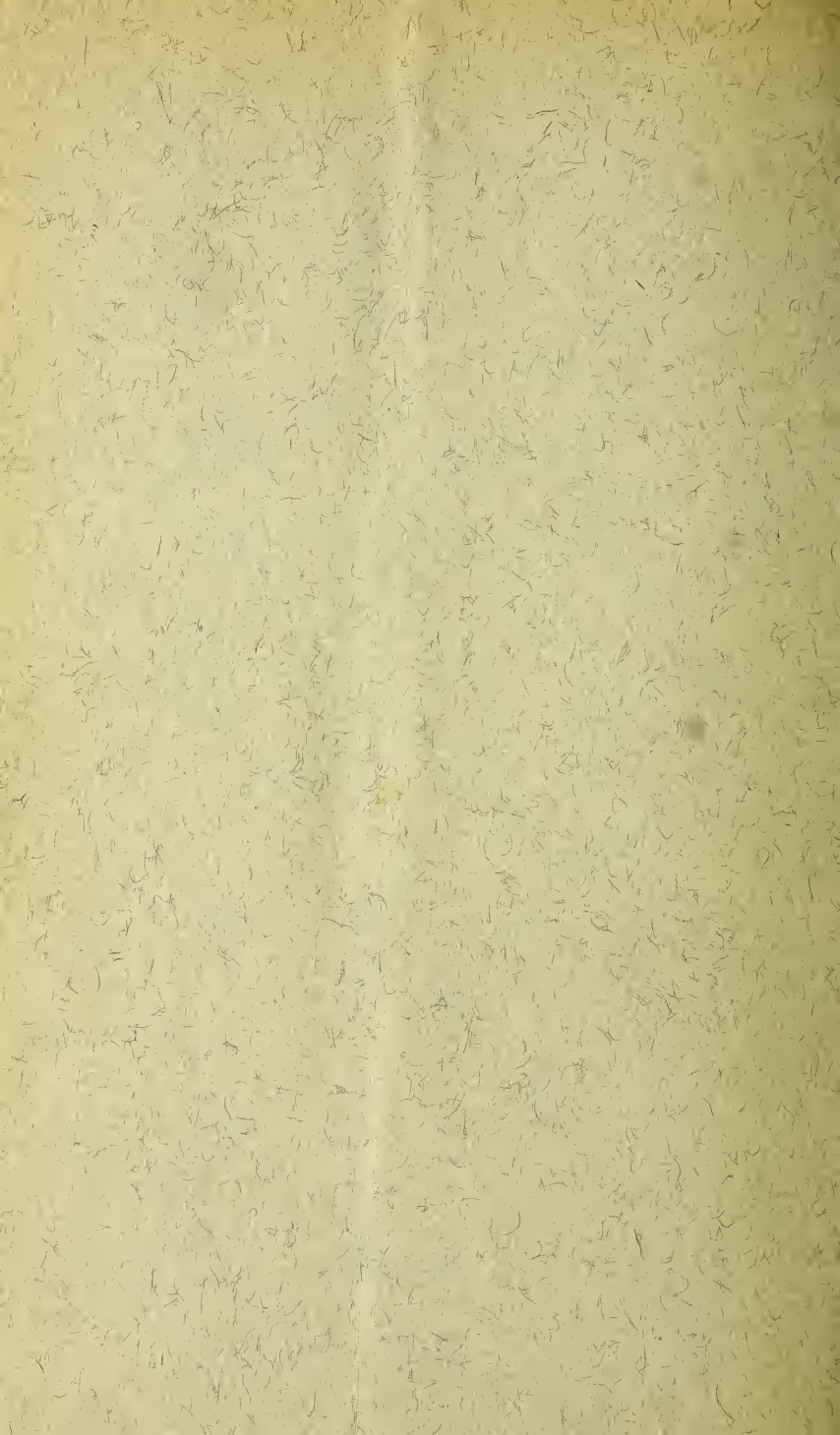

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Association.

### OBJECTS

Article 2. The object of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches in more efficient work for the spread of the gospel in our bounds, and in all the world, and in this work the Association will co-operate with the Baptist State Convention.

Article 3. The membership of this body shall be all the ordained ministers of the churches of the Association, and three delegates from each church. A letter certifying their appointment and giving statistics of the membership and work of the church shall be sent to the Clerk at least fifteen days before the opening of the session.

### ORGANIZATION

Article 4. At each annual session of the body there shall be elected a Moderator and Clerk and Treasurer. This election shall take place here after at the sitting of the association instead of at the close of the session, and those elected shall serve through the next session.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 5. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint committees, and perform such duties as are required of presiding officers.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, and superintend the printing and distribution to the churches and the proceedings of the body.

Article 7. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds sent to the Association, to pay them out as the Association may direct, and make a report at each annual session.

### TIME AND PLACE

Article 8. The Association shall hold an annual meeting at such time and place as may be agreed upon.

### APPOINTMENTS

Article 9. At each annual meeting there shall be appointed an executive committee of five brethren who shall look after the destitution in the bounds of this Association, and co-operate with the State Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention, making to the next session a report of the work done and all the general State Mission work.

Article 10. Association shall convene annually on the last Friday in Aug. At each annual session and there shall be appointed committees to make reports to the ensuing session, on

the following subjects, to-wit: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Pastoral Support, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Biblical Recorder, Temperance, Digest Church Letter, Finance, Place and Preacher for next Association, and Baptist Hospital.

#### ORDER OF RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

Article 11. Each annual session shall be introduced by a sermon by some brother previously appointed.

Article 12. In addition to the introductory sermon the committee on religious exercises shall arrange at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while the sermon is being delivered; but no sermon shall be scheduled while the Association is engaged in a business session.

#### PREROGATIVES

Article 13. The Association will not retain in permanent fellowship any church that retains in its fellowship any member who is disorderly in doctrine or practice, or who makes, sells, or in any way deals in ardent spirits as a beverage.

#### CONSTITUTION—HOW AMENDED

Article 14. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

#### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

1st. We believe in one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the God-head, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible, the New Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that the salvation is by Grace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by qualified administrators, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace to glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

#### RULES OF ORDER

1. Every session shall be opened and closed by prayer.
2. When the Moderator calls the house to order, every member shall at once take his seat.
3. When a member wishes to speak he shall rise and ad-

dress the Moderator, and not proceed until he is recognized.

4. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject except by permission of the body.

5. No member shall leave the body during the session without the permission of the Moderator.

6. It shall be counted disorder for any member to stand up, leave the house or hold private conversation while any person is speaking.

## REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

All down through the years for the past century or more, State Missions have stood for, are standing for today, and will continue to stand for in the future, the things our Savior taught us to do and support.

### HOME MISSION REPORT

Christ was a world-citizen with a world-mission. "The uttermost part of the earth" was His objective, but His homeland was the point of approach. We should follow Christ's method. If we are to have a world-wide mission it must begin in the lives of Southern Baptists.

The achievement of the Home Mission Board for the past ninety-four years have been glorious. During this period the Board has employed, individually and in co-operation with other mission agencies, 44,000 missionaries and workers for one year, or one missionary for 44,000 years. If we break this up into groups it will give 269 missionaries working every day since the Declaration of Independence was signed in 1776, down to this good hour.

These missionaries have baptized 865,000 people, which is equal to one out of every five of our total number of Church members. They have organized 8,600 churches. This is equal to one out of every three of our total number of churches. At the present time we have 371 missionaries in the field working in 756 mission stations who have distributed 29,226 Bibles, Testaments and portions of Scripture. They have led 5,250 to make professions of faith in Christ and have received into fellowship of the Church 3,835 during the last year.

The task is just begun. Instead of geographic barriers to overcome today we have racial prejudice and class distinctions. We have the foreigner in our midst who needs the ministry of the church, and the underprivileged in every section who need the helping hand of those who minister in the name of our Savior. May we take the task of Home Missions to heart and support it with all our power.
