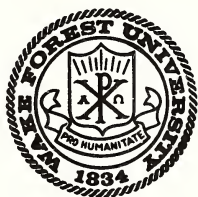

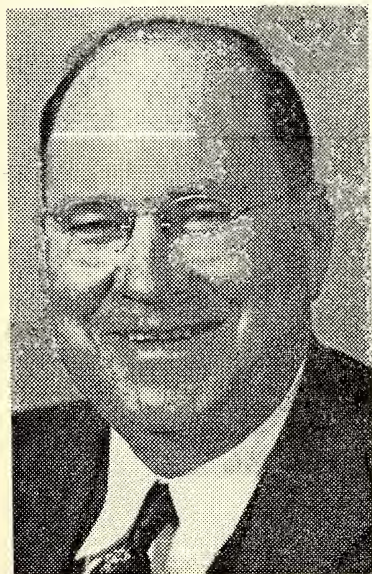
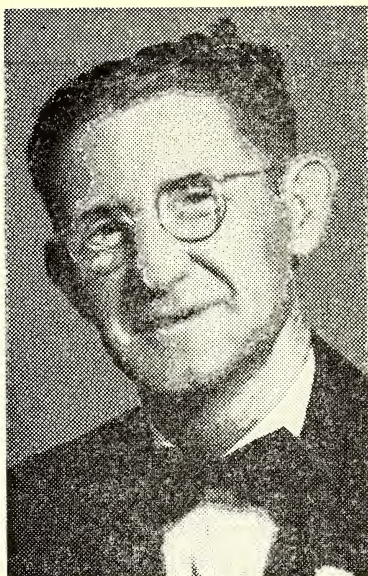

Constitution and By-Laws

PREAMBLE

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Sandhills Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of co-operating Missionary Baptist Churches within the area served by the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership "NEW OR ESTABLISHED" shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the messengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. For the first year the church shall have all privileges of the Association except that of voting.

An established and co-operating church coming from another Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, and upon recommendation of that Association, and upon favorable recommendation of our Committee on Reception of Churches, and favorable vote of the Association, shall be received immediately into full fellowship of the Association.

Any church not previously affiliated with an Association, whether new or established, seeking admittance to this Association, shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year.

Section 3. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

Section 4. Any church may withdraw membership from this Association at its pleasure.

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each additional fifty members or major fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

B. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited to the Pastors, Officers of the Association, and the duly elected messengers or their alternates.

Section 3. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power to infringe on any of the internal rights of the individual churches. It may advise with the member churches and recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance and may claim for its objects and programs the highest consideration.

ARTICLE V. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Historian and three Trustees. The officers shall be elected at the annual meeting and installed at the close of the morning session of the second day. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one-year terms in succession.

Section 2. Departments. The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Baptist Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, and the Department of Church Music. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary to the Association. The Department heads shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Committees. There shall be the following standing committees: Committee on Committees, Committee on Resolutions, Committee on Reception of Churches, Committee on Place and Preacher, Committee on Ordination, Program Committee, Executive and Promotion Committee.

Section 4. Employees. The Missionary and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole Program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction of and be subject to the authority of the Executive Committee. They shall be nominated by the Promotion Committee and elected by the Executive Committee or the Association, in Annual Session.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

BY-LAWS

The work of the Association shall be governed by the following By-Laws.

ARTICLE I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Moderator shall preside over the sessions of the Association and see that order and decorum are observed by everyone present. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Clerk-Treasurer:

- (1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.
- (3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents.

ments belonging to the Association.

(4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association. Disbursement shall be made in accordance with the budget adopted by the Association. Non-budgeted items must be approved by the Executive Committee.

(5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association. For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

Section 5: The Trustees shall hold title to all property of the Association. When authorized by the Executive Committee of the Association, they shall execute notes secured by mortgages and deeds of trust in the purchase of church sites or other property. The Trustees in all acts with respects to property purchases shall be controlled and directed by the Association through its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Committee on Committees, consisting of five members, shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee on Committees shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 2. The Program Committee, which shall consist of three members, shall plan well in advance the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the Annual Meeting.

Section 3. The Committee on Reception of Churches, composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrines, practices, and co-operation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement of its findings along with its recommendations shall be submitted to the Association in Annual Session, or to the Executive Committee as provided herein.

An established and co-operating church coming from another Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, and upon favorable recommendation of the Committee on Reception of Churches, and a favorable vote of the Association, shall be received immediately into full fellowship of the Association.

Any church not previously affiliated with an Association, whether new or established, seeking admittance to this Association, shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year, or the major part thereof.

Section 4. The Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions of appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

Section 5. The Committee on Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of meeting and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 6. The Committee on Ordination, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led, to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 7. The Nominating Committee, consisting of five members,

shall present a list of nominations for each office of the Association to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 8. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after each fifth Sunday, at a time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the event that regular members cannot attend Executive Committee Meetings.

Section 9. The Promotion Committee shall consist of nine members with the Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer acting as ex-officio members. It shall be the duty of this committee, co-operating with the Missionary, to devise ways and means, recommend measures, and initiate action, implementing promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association. It shall receive and disburse all Mission Club Funds. This committee shall, at the Executive Committee meetings, bring regular reports regarding receipts, disbursements, progress made, and future plans for our Associational Missions Program.

ARTICLE III. PROCEDURE

All business shall be conducted and all discussions shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

EVANGELISTIC REPORT

Evangelism is the objective, purpose and program of every Baptist Church that follows the New Testament pattern. It is the spirit of evangelism that undergirds, motivates and inspires God's people for personal witnessing, for missions and for the carrying out of Christ's Great Commission to the ends of the earth. In co-operation with our total convention program it is the prayer of your chairman of evangelism that the pastors and all church leaders will make and keep this all-inclusive purpose as a constant objective of every organization and of the total program of every Baptist Church in the South Sandy Creek Association.

Realizing the centrality of evangelism in all of God's work the churches in our Association have co-operated together during the past year to carry out the command of our Lord. It is our firm belief, according to Romans 1:16, that the Gospel is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth. That the Gospel is the good tidings of Christ's birth, death, burial, and resurrection for the sin of the world, according to Luke 2:7-12, and I Cor. 15:1-4. Also, we believe that the only agencies in the Bible empowered and commissioned to give this Gospel to a lost world are the churches according to Matt. 28:18-20. Therefore the churches of our Association are trying to do their part to carry out this belief.

From October, 1958, through September, 1959, 19 churches of the South Sandy Creek Association reported baptisms. These 19 churches reported a total of 238. From March 15th-29th of this year, 19 out of the 25 churches participated in the continent-wide Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade. Two other churches held revivals one week later,

making a total of 21. Out of this total 73 baptisms were reported, along with many dedications to special Christian callings.

Evangelism is the heart of God's work on earth. No believing Christian in our Association is left out. He must take part in evangelizing our Association, state, nation, and world. While we can feel that we have been busy about the primary task much remains to be done. So long as there is one lost person it is our task to rise up and seek the opportunity of telling that one the story of Jesus Christ.

REPORT TO THE SOUTH SANDY CREEK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION ON THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

I was asked to speak to you at the annual associational meeting about the Cooperative Program. Now I know that we are not supposed to emphasize the bad points, but when I looked at our Associational record and looked at the needs of the world I realized that unless we looked at what we should be doing as far as the Cooperative Program is concerned we would have very little to report.

The Cooperative Program is just what the name indicates: people cooperating together to get the Lord's work done. Baptists, historically, are independent of each other but by the very definition of the name Baptists we are cooperating to get the work done. Yet some churches use the name Southern Baptists and do the very minimum required legally in a time which calls for maximum effort. We have churches in our Association which take an offering for the Orphanage, for the Hospital, or for the Home for the Aging, or some other cause once a year in order to fulfill the requirements of cooperating together in one Southern Baptist cause. They send no gifts through the Cooperative Program, they do not support the Associational program, and they choose only their pet project to support. Certainly we have much cause for concern and prayer as we look at the record.

Using the figures from last year's annual we see that last year to foreign missions we in the South Sandy Creek Association gave \$3,502.15, or an average of a dollar and three cents a year per resident member of this Association for foreign missions. This figures out to approximately two cents a week! For Home Missions we gave \$1,855.51. This is fifty-five cents per year per resident member in our association or about a penny a week. For State Missions we gave \$1,367.84, or about forty and one-half cents per year per resident member, and to Associational Missions we averaged forty-three cents per year per resident member. Now add all these up and we find that we gave two dollars and forty-one cents per year last year to all missions causes!

What? You say that's not fair? What about the orphanages, hospitals, homes for the aging, and schools we were also called on to support? Well, maybe you're right. Let's see, yes, yes! the picture does look better there. Last year 3,372 members of Southern Baptist churches, living in and around Moore County, gave a total of \$21,093 for all mission causes and all benevolences. This is \$6.25 per year, or about fifty cents each per month; still less than a cent and a half per day!

Oh, you say you have building programs at home; that we must have a strong base of operations if we are to have a strong effective world missions program? That all building, all teaching, and everything we do at home can be considered missions? All right, let's look. Last year our total gifts to all causes were \$180,370. This figure shows

aries and others, the circulation of the Recorder is well over the 62,000 mark.

We are pleased to report that the circulation of Charity and Children is steadily increasing and is now finding its way into more of our Sunday Schools each Sunday morning. Beyond our state our own Southern Baptist presses are pouring out a continual stream of the finest literature of any age — graded to suit the needs of all ages.

The American Bible Society is still doing a monumental work in helping missionaries translate the Bible, publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost, for mission work around the world. Last year our offering fell short some \$300 of the year before. Brother Huggins stated in his letter of last June that if the people in our churches and Sunday Schools in N. C. would give just 10 cents each for this worthy cause the total would be fifty to sixty thousand dollars—more than five times the amount we are now giving.

We recommend: First, that we encourage daily Bible reading in each home during this associational year. Second, that we endeavor to put our two state papers, Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children, in each home. Third, that we take at least one offering for the American Bible Society. Fourth, we use and introduce to our people the many fine magazines, books and other publications published by the Southern Baptist Convention and W. M. U.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Repeatedly, we hear the serious question, "When your child is ready for college, will college be ready for him?" As thinking and planning people, this concerns us to the fullest. We want our children to have every opportunity for a fuller and more satisfying life. But, unless we act today, and this year, and in the years ahead, we are warned, by those who know, that our children may not have these opportunities. Thus this report is an appeal to do some serious thinking and deep digging in order that we might rise up as men of God to meet the mounting demands of our time.

As Baptists, when our children get ready for college, we want a Baptist college ready for them. Not because we are narrow-minded do we desire this, but because we are committed to the truth that God

ought to be at the center of life — even life on a college campus. Certainly, our Baptist colleges here in North Carolina — Wake Forest, Chowan, Mars Hill, Campbell, Wingate, Meredith, and Gardner-Webb — are God-centered institutions of learning, doing the best they can with the children we send them.

In these seven colleges are approximately one-eighth of the college students in North Carolina. This seems like a goodly number, yet at the present time our colleges can only provide for one out of every four Baptist youth going to college. In the coming “tidal wave of college students,” one-half will be our Baptist young people. Thus you can readily see the expanded facilities and teachers which we will need if we are to minister to our youth educationally as we should.

The report of the Committee of Twenty-five did not recommend any additional colleges. It did, however, suggest that some of our Junior colleges be expanded to Senior colleges. Work has already begun toward this end. It is imperative, therefore, that we undergird and support this expansion program.

This report recommends: (1) that Christian Education Day be observed in every church of this Association on Father's Day, (2) that we strive to increase our gifts by at least 25%.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING

“Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me.” (Matthew 25:40)

The ninth year of operation of the Baptist Homes for Aging began March 16, 1959. All three of the Homes — Resthaven, Albemarle, and Headquarters — have had a good year, and have been filled practically all year to capacity — 119, counting residents and helpers. When vacancies occur, there are always more applications on the waiting list than rooms to be filled.

This has been another year of God's favor upon the Homes and of encouraging progress.

The two most pressing needs of the Homes for Aging now are (1) to finish raising the funds to start construction of the Hamilton Homes, and (2) to raise about \$75,000 to cover the balance needed to pay for the additional facilities in the infirmary expansion. So, a total amount of \$150,000 must be raised, therefore, to finish these two projects. When they are completed, 60 more bedrooms will be added for anxious and needy residents, thus increasing the total capacity of all the Homes to 170 residents.

Would you, the members of South Sandy Creek Association, like to have a generous part in helping to make these plans become a reality at the earliest possible date? Why not furnish, or endow, or construct a room with your gift? If you are not able to do as much, send the amount you are able to give to N. C. REPORT ON THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Our Baptist Hospital seeks to serve our people with a complete program of specialized medical care for all who need it. Our people go in great numbers with all types of serious illness, from all walks of life, and in all financial circumstances, to receive the ministry of our Baptist medical center. A constant effort is made to keep it personal and Christian in its care of sick people.

Last year Service Patients from 95 counties of the State made over 66,000 visits to the 31 clinics of the Out-Patient Department, which is open to families not able to pay the full cost of their medical care. About the same number of office visits was made by Private or full-pay patients. More than 16,000 sick persons were hospitalized for 132,000 days of bed care.

Forty per cent of the hospital service is rendered the patients who go to the Out-Patient Clinics or who enter the hospital through the Out-Patient Department. The services of the physicians are free to all these patients, but the hospital charges must be paid unless other arrangements are made by the family.

Last year the hospital spent well over one million dollars in the care of these Service Patients. The Mother's Day Fund, along with the welfare funds and assistance from other agencies and foundations, enables the hospital to provide more than half of this service free for our very poor people. The Mother's Day Fund, alone, however, has not covered the full cost of the care of even the most needy.

We need to lay upon the hearts of our members the necessity of the Mother's Day Fund, if our Baptist Hospital is to provide this important service for our poorer people.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC. ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT — 1959

North Carolina Baptists have shown remarkable interest in their Children's Homes during the past year. Numerous church groups have visited the three campuses. Continued financial support has been encouraging. Awakened interest in your Child Care Program has been evidence in many respects.

Program Studied

During the past year members of the Children's Homes staff, under the best leadership available, have engaged themselves in a conscientious study of the entire Child Care program sponsored by North Carolina Baptists. Findings have been gratifying. The program has a commendable history and is one of the best in the nation. Every effort is being made by the present administration to continue the best care possible for dependent children.

Children Served

More than 1,000 boys and girls were served by the Children's Homes during the past year. Mills Home, Kennedy Home, and Odum Home provided care for 547 children while 197 lived in foster homes. Through financial assistance of the Mothers Aid program, 40 children were able to live with their mothers. Supervision and financial help were afforded 30 college students. Resourceful case workers assisted 214 additional children to find homes with relatives and other social service agencies.

Cottage Construction

Three cottages are currently under construction — one at each of the three Homes. The Roy Culler family of High Point is providing funds for a boys cottage at Mills Home. The H. C. Ferebee family of Camden is making possible a cottage for girls at Kennedy Home. The new cottage at Pembroke will provide administrative offices, living accommodations as well as kitchen and dining facilities for the Indian boys and girls.

Administrative Change

Mr. Vernon S. Sparrow became Superintendent at Mills Home, Thomasville, July 1, 1959. He comes to this post with an excellent background of training and experience. Prior to Mr. Sparrow's going to Mills Home he served as Associate Pastor and Minister of Education in the First Baptist Church of Lenoir.

Significant Convention Action

Significant recommendations relative to the Children's Homes were adopted by the Baptist State Convention in May following a two and a half year study by the Committee of Twenty-five. They are as follows:

1. That the number of children in foster home care be increased to approximate the number in institutional care.
2. That the Children's Homes begin to develop new types of programs to help children who are not being adequately cared for in other ways.
3. That increased attention be given to families throughout the state by well-trained, mature case work consultants to help avoid family breakdowns.

More Adequate Financial Support

The Convention has voted to bring the Children's Homes into the Cooperative Program on the same basis as all other institutions and objects. Churches may continue to send Once-A-Month offerings and special gifts. Designated gifts from Churches to the Children's Homes will be administered by the Convention in the same manner as designated gifts from Churches to other institutions. The Homes are encouraged with this improved financial relationship with the Convention. For lack of sufficient income the Homes operated on a \$22,000 deficit in 1958. The deficit for 1959 will be approximately \$65,000. The only way the Homes have of meeting the \$65,000 deficit this year is through a substantial increase in the Thanksgiving Offering.

What of the Future?

With the increase in population, the development of industry, the growth of cities and the mounting tensions in present day society, there is an increasing demand for services to dependent children. Your Children's Homes are being asked by the Convention to expand their services. With your prayers, loyal and generous support, your leadership will continue to move forward as resources are made available.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Rev. C. A. Tuttle and Rev. E. Paul West, Jr., are the new Pastors in the Association this year. Rev. William Harold Faggart was a new Pastor but he resigned the Pastorate of the Calvary Baptist Church on October 4, 1959.

The Executive Committee of the Association on December 1, 1958, met at the Taylor Memorial Baptist Church, on March 30, 1959 at the Cameron Baptist Church, on June 1st at the Calvary Baptist Church and on August 31st at the Ashley Heights Baptist Church. At the June 1st meeting the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church was voted a member of the Association pending ratification by the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association at its annual meeting in October, 1959.

On August 28, 1959, a meeting composed mostly of laymen met at the Southern Pines Baptist Church. At the meeting Missionary Lee Pridden presented the needs and a challenge for Baptist advancement in the Association. Jack Taylor, J. D. Arey, Jr., and Fred Taylor were selected as an Investigation Committee to locate a possible site for a new Church in the area of the Association.

The publication of "The Sandhill Baptist" this year is a welcome source of information to the Association. Thanks is due Missionary Lee Pridden for his fine work as editor.

On September 18, 1959, a Brotherhood dinner meeting was held in the Aberdeen church. A number of inspiring messages were given, both in word and in song. The local Brotherhood officers were elected and Brotherhood officers for the Association were selected to be presented to the Association for approval at its annual meeting in October.

Fifteen churches now have their pastors living in their communities.

The M-Night was held in the Aberdeen Baptist Church.

The First Baptist Church, Aberdeen, N. C., has improved their church grounds.

The Ashley Heights Baptist Church has organized a Training Union and has repaired and painted the parsonage for their new Pastor, Rev. E. Paul West, Jr., who began his ministry in May, 1959.

The Bethlehem Baptist Church has added new song books to their equipment. The Church is also now in the process of raising funds for a new educational building.

The Calvary Baptist Church has added 50 new song books to their equipment and is in the process of building additional Sunday School rooms.

The Cameron Baptist Church has bought a film projector and screen. A Training Union has been organized. Two lots which adjoin the church property have been bought. Also some remodeling has been done to the parsonage as well as having it termite proofed.

The Carthage Baptist Church has constructed a new educational building at a cost of \$45,000, and it as been well furnished inside. Also the church parking lot has been paved.

The (Robbins) Cross Roads Baptist Church ordained Fred Richardson to be their Pastor on October 4, 1959.

The Ephesus Baptist Church has a Seminary student, Rev. Bernard Fallin, as their Pastor, and he lives in the community.

The Flint Hill Baptist Church has beautified their church grounds at an estimated cost of \$300.00.

Rev. E. Paul West, Jr., began his ministry at the Ives Memorial Baptist Church on May 1, 1959. One half of the church building has been re-roofed at a cost of \$280.00. Steps and rails have been built and painted both inside and outside the Sunday School Department at a cost of \$150.00. The Church purchased material for 20 white summer robes and a Church member generously gave her time to make them. The choir robes are dedicated to the memory of the former beloved Pastor, Rev. W. Ray Gosnell, who passed away on December 16, 1958.

The Lemon Springs Baptist Church has erected an educational building at a cost of \$8,249.52. Also a carpet has been purchased at a cost of \$300.00.

The New Home Baptist Church has had a change of Pastors during the past year but as yet has not called a new Pastor.

The Pine Grove Baptist Church has organized a Training Union and has added 50 new song books to their equipment at a cost of \$65.29.

The Red Branch Baptist Church is planning to remodel their auditorium, get new pews as well as to improve the ceiling, walls and floors of the building.

The Robbins Baptist Church is one of the Churches that is blessed with having their Pastor living in their community.

The Southern Pines Baptist Church keeps its grounds looking well, which is especially due to their seasonal replanting of their lawn. Southern Pines added more than \$500.00 worth of additional Sunday School furniture in Beginner and Primary Departments, obtained an A. B. Dick Model 91 Mimeograph, a Soundsciber dictating and transcribing set, an inter-office 2-way communications system, and a new piano in the Primary Department; also called a full-time director of Music and Education, Miss Anna Ruth King. She was here for the summer and will return to stay in February, 1960.

The Taylor Memorial Baptist Church has added a piano and new song books to their equipment.

The Unity Grove Baptist Church has divided their basement into Sunday School rooms and put a drainage ditch around the church at total cost of \$503.55.

The Vass Baptist Church has an excellent pastorium which enables their pastor to live in their community.

Rev. C. A. Tuttle is the new Pastor of the West End Baptist Church. Rev. J. C. Halliburton was their former Pastor. During this year the Church has licensed Morris E. Shelton to preach the Gospel. Work has been done on the Sunday School rooms at a cost of \$700.00 and a Church Directory has been placed on their lawn.

IN MEMORIAM**REPORT ON OUR LOVED ONES DECEASED**

At this time let us pause in memory and loving devotion to those of our friends and loved ones who have been called from their labors and toils of this temporary field of opportunity and service to their permanent home and reward with Jesus Christ, our Lord and Redeemer. We, as Christians striving to follow Him, should joyfully and courageously yield in humble submission to His will and have faith to accept and completely rely on His promise when He said, "In my Father's House are many mansions, if it were not so, I would have told you; I go to prepare a place for you, and if I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto Myself; that where I am, there ye may be also." Christ is not dead. He is a living Savior and Lord and those of our comrades who have gone to join Him and be where He is are not dead, but more alive than when they were with us in the flesh. At times we have been weak enough to think of them as dead, but they only passed through the portal into a higher stage of immortal being. "This we believe."

As we march forward together let our faith and courage be increased by the additional fact that our comrades who fell out of our ranks and went to their reward during the past year, and a multitude of comrades of other years, compass about us as "a great cloud of witnesses" seeking to cheer us and urge us on to close the ranks with new and more zealous Christian soldiers as we onward march with the Cross of Jesus having gone before.

Constitution and By-Laws

PREAMBLE

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Sandhills Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of co-operating Missionary Baptist Churches within the area served by the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership "NEW OR ESTABLISHED" shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the messengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. For the first year the church shall have all privileges of the Association except that of voting.

An established and co-operating church coming from another Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, and upon recommendation of that Association, and upon favorable recommendation of our Committee on Reception of Churches, and favorable vote of the Association, shall be received immediately into full fellowship of the Association.

Any church not previously affiliated with an Association, whether new or established, seeking admittance to this Association, shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year.

Section 3. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

Section 4. Any church may withdraw membership from this Association at its pleasure.

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Association shall be com-

posed of (1) all officers of the Association; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each additional fifty members or major fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

B. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited to the Pastors, Officers of the Association, and the duly elected Messengers or their alternates.

Section 3. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power to infringe on any of the internal rights of the individual churches. It may advise with the member churches and recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance and may claim for its objects and programs the highest consideration.

ARTICLE V. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. **Officers.** The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Historian and three Trustees. The officers shall be elected at the annual meeting and installed at the close of the morning session of the second day. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one-year terms in succession.

Section 2. **Departments.** The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Baptist Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, and the Department of Church Music. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary to the Association. The Department heads shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. **Committees.** There shall be the following standing committees: Committee on Committees, Committee on Resolutions, Committee on Reception of Churches, Committee on Place and Preacher, Committee on Ordination, Program Committee, Executive and Promotion Committee.

Section 4. **Employees.** The Missionary and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole Program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction of and be subject to the authority of the Executive Committee. They shall be nominated by the Promotion Committee and elected by the Executive Committee or the Association, in Annual Session.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

BY-LAWS

The work of the Association shall be governed by the following By-Laws:

ARTICLE I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Moderator shall preside over the sessions of the Association and see that order and decorum are observed by everyone present. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Clerk-Treasurer:

(1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.

(3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.

(4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association. Disbursement shall be made in accordance with the budget adopted by the Association. Non-budgeted items must be approved by the Executive Committee.

(5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

Section 5. The Trustees shall hold title to all property of the Association. When authorized by the Executive Committee of the Association, they shall execute notes secured by mortgages and deeds of trust in the purchase of church sites or other property. The Trustees in all acts with respects to property purchases shall be controlled and directed by the Association through its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Committee on Committees, consisting of five members, shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee on Committees shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 2. The Program Committee, which shall consist of three

members, shall plan well in advance the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the Annual Meeting.

Section 3. The Committee on Reception of Churches, composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrines, practices, and co-operation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement of its findings along with its recommendations shall be submitted to the Association in Annual Session, or to the Executive Committee as provided herein.

An established and co-operating church coming from another Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, and upon favorable recommendation of the Committee on Reception of Churches, and a favorable vote of the Association, shall be received immediately into full fellowship of the Association.

Any church not previously affiliated with an Association, whether new or established, seeking admittance to this Association, shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year, or the major part thereof.

Section 4. The Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions of appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

Section 5. The Committee on Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of meeting and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 6. The Committee on Ordination, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led, to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 7. The Nominating Committee, consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations for each office of the Association to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 8. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after each fifth Sun-

day, at a time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the event that regular members cannot attend Executive Committee Meetings.

Section 9. The Promotion Committee shall consist of nine members with the Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer acting as ex-officio members. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Missionary, to devise ways and means, recommend measures, and initiate action, implementing promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association. It shall receive and disburse all Mission Club Funds. This committee shall, at the Executive Committee meetings, bring regular reports regarding receipts, disbursements, progress made, and future plans for our Associational Missions Program.

ARTICLE III. PROCEDURE

All business shall be conducted and all discussions shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

5. The new pastor in the Association, Ernest Poston of Bethlehem, was called to the front and welcomed into the Association.

6. All members present from the new organized church, Fairview Baptist, were called to the front and welcomed in the the Sandhills Baptist Association by the Associational Missionary, Lee Pridgen.

7. Mrs. Fred Taylor read the report of the W. M. U. and moved its adoption. Motion seconded and report adopted.

W. M. U. REPORT

The W. M. U. story in World Missions is both happy and sad. The purpose of W. M. U. is to promote Christian missions through a program of — we call it — the four fundamentals: that is, 1. Mission Study; 2, prayer; 3, Stewardship; and 4, community missions. We put Mission Study first because we feel that through it we become aware of the needs from our front door to the farthest corners of the world. When we have become aware, then our hearts are burdened and we pray, which motivates us to give our tithes and offerings to minister to the less fortunate spiritually and physically — in our communities and around the world.

As I give a few statistics, you will see the two sides of our story. Of the 26 churches in our association only 19 have any mission organization. Of the 19 only 12 have any youth organization; 11 taught a mission book; 11 had a season of prayer for Home and Foreign missions; only 9 did any soul-winning visitation. We have over 550 WMS members in youth organizations. Of the WMS members less than 40% tithe; of the 240 odd YWA and GA members, less than

20% title. Little over half of the WMS members read a mission book.

During the year we have had a Sunbeam work shop for Sunbeam Band leaders which was well attended (73); Combination Mission Study, Stewardship and Community Mission Institute with only about 50 attending; Leadership Conference at Carthage and Annual Meeting at Robbins with over 100 attending each. Then we have had a YWA banquet, also.

According to my records, which may not be exactly accurate, Woman's Missionary Union of Sandhill Association has given a total of over \$5,000.00 to Home, Foreign and State missions and the Heck-Jones Memorial fund.

The W. M. U. watchword for this year is "For the Love of Christ Constraineth Us." (II Cor. 5:14). Love controls, urges and impels. Why do women (some) give up a great amount of their time and make other sacrifices to the Lord's service? Is it for prestige, contacts or opportunities? We believe not. We believe that it is because that the "Love of Christ Constraineth Us." From Amy Carmichael's book "IF", we read, and I quote:

"If the praise of man elates me and his blame depresses me; if I cannot rest under misunderstanding without defending myself; if I love to be loved more than to love, to be served more than to serve, then I know nothing of Calvary love.

"If I covet any place on earth but the dust at the foot of the cross, then I know nothing of Calvary love.

"If I put my own happiness before the well-being of the work entrusted to me . . . then I know nothing of Calvary love."

We pray that every WMS leader, this year, will be motivated by love.

Bro. Christopher for his very fine co-operation. This brings our work to three active units within The Sandhills Association.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

In this crucial year in American history, the following quotation is so pertinent as we think of the importance of the **Biblical Recorder** and other Baptist publications: "If religious literature is not widely circulated among the masses of this country, I do not know what is to become of us as a nation. If truth be not diffused, error will be; if God and His Word are not received, the devil and his work will gain the ascendancy; if the evangelical volume does not reach every hamlet, the pages of a corrupt and licentious literature will; if the power of the Gospel is not felt through the length and

breadth of our land, anarchy and misrule, degradation and misery, corruption and darkness will reign."

Our own Baptist presses are turning out today some of the finest literature of any age, all graded to suit the needs of young and old. In our own state we have two excellent periodicals — *The Charity and Children* and *The Biblical Recorder*. We are happy to note that *The Charity and Children* is now finding its way into most of our Sunday Schools each Sunday morning.

A continuing campaign is being made to put *The Recorder* into more church budgets. As every pastor knows, an informed membership is essential if a church makes progress.

This has been a year of change and transition for our Baptist state paper. On January 1, J. Morse Grant became editor, succeeding Dr. L. L. Carpenter, who retired after 17 years in the editor's chair. Editor Grant came to *The Recorder* after 10 years as editor of *Charity and Children*.

Since the first of the year, a number of changes have been made in *The Recorder*, including larger type, and full-page pictures on the cover. In a study made by a nationally-known professor of journalism, *The Recorder* was rated among the top three state papers in the Southern Baptist Convention. *The Recorder* staff will not be satisfied until it rates No. 1 among the 27 state papers.

For the price of a 3c or 4c postage stamp, *The Recorder* can be sent to each family in your church. For a 4c stamp each week, or \$2.00 a year, you can receive the paper in the Club Plan of four or more subscribers in the same church. Certainly our Baptist families are worth 3c or 4c per week. With the many crucial issues coming up in the world almost daily, it is imperative that Baptists be informed about them. The best source is our Baptist state paper.

We are indebted to the American Bible Society for its monumental work in translating, printing and distributing the Bible to almost every part of the world. More than 17½ million scripture volumes were distributed last year to our missionaries and armed forces and such strategic areas as West Germany and other lands along the Iron Curtain. If the peoples of the world are to know Jesus Christ, each person must have the Bible in his own language; because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak. The help of every Baptist church is needed each year.

Make no mistakes, the printed page is going to win the battle for men's minds and hearts. The greatest movements of this world depend heavily on printer's ink to get their messages across. We must do more than we are doing to circulate good wholesome religious literature among the masses in this country if we are to stay in this battle to win the loyalties of men and women, boys and girls. We must, in the words of the Apostle Paul, "Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good."

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

"He opened their understanding." This is the purpose of the Bible from its opening to its close.

To the end that this purpose may be realized, North Carolina Baptists have established seven colleges which are Mars Hill, Gardner-Webb, Wake Forest, Wingate, Campbell, Meredith and Chowan. Enrolled in these colleges last year were 8,100 students.

The total annual cost for the operation of these colleges last year was above \$10,000,000, of which about \$500,000 was contributed through our Baptist Cooperative Program. An additional \$600,000 was provided for capital outlay or plant improvement and expansion.

The committee of our Baptist State Convention, known as "The Committee of 25", appointed in 1956, and after three years of study recommended the following:

1. That at Wake Forest, in addition to the four years of undergraduate instruction, provision be made as rapidly as possible for resuming graduate study leading to Master's and Doctor's degrees.

2. That at Mars Hill, Campbell and Wingate, all now two-year colleges, consider the possibility of becoming four-year colleges.

3. That Gardner-Webb and Chowan continue as two-year colleges until, in the belief of their trustees and administrators, the time shall have come at which it is advisable to change to four-year college status.

4. At Meredith that provision be made as soon as possible for a student body of one thousand.

Besides these seven colleges, we are happy to remember that, through the Southern Baptist Convention, North Carolina Baptists share in the support of seven seminaries, one of which is located in our own state, at Wake Forest.

It is believed that by 1970 there will be in North Carolina 35,000 Baptist young men and women in college. Who shall provide for their instruction? The state? Other denominations? Or Baptists? Let us not be afraid to face the magnitude of this opportunity, to ask God's direction, and to plan, as Baptists, to meet it, to the end that, through the Christ-trained leadership of tomorrow, we may be used of God to bless the whole world.

SUGGESTED REPORT (1960)

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

By William A. Poole, General Superintendent

God's gift to the Homes for the Aging during the past nine years has been James M. Haynes, Sr. No man could have worked harder, or accomplished more, than this dedicated man of God. On July 1, he relinquished the heavy and challenging responsibilities of the office of general superintendent to his successor, William A. Poole.

The new superintendent is diligently at work and is finding a solid foundation on which to build and expand our ministry to the aging in our midst.

Great blessings are in store for us in this tenth year of our Homes for the Aging. The new Infirmary Annex, constructed at a cost of \$193,000, and with 28 new rooms, will be in use by September 1. In addition to these rooms, there is a nurse's station, lounge and rest room, a solarium, a room with an autoclave for the sterilization of instruments, three baths, a laundry room, and a utility room. It is hoped that the construction of the proposed new Hamilton Home can be started by late summer, with facilities for around 30 additional residents. Our hats are off to all who have given so liberally and worked so tirelessly in bringing this fourth Home to fulfillment!

At the present, there are sixty applicants on the waiting list, and new inquiries and applications pouring in daily. We now have a total of 106 residents in our three homes — Resthaven, 20; Albemarle, 34; Headquarters, 52. Even with our new facilities, it is not unrealistic to say that we could fill rooms up to 500 in the next two years. We must attempt great things for God and expect great things from God as we plan for the future in our ministry to the ever-growing number of the aging who need the loving care of North Carolina Baptists.

One of the life-lines in our work is the vital relationship that we have with the pastors and churches in our Convention. We could not operate without this very important and blessed tie that binds.

We are increasingly dependent upon the prayers and the financial support of the churches. During the fiscal year, October 1, 1959, to August 1, 1960, we have received \$82,521.20 from the churches. Of this amount, \$76,352.70 was contributed through the Special Day Offering in February. In addition to the Special Day Offering and designated gifts, we have received from the churches through the Co-operative Program, \$39,635.19, during the period October 1, 1959 — July 1, 1960. Our annual support from the Co-operative Program is \$50,000. We are profoundly grateful to God and to everyone who has had a part in contributing to the worthy cause which we represent.

We are constantly experiencing mixed emotions in the Homes. We rejoiced with Aunt Fannie Drumwright on her 99th birthday in July, and were saddened by the deaths of Miss Lillie Herring in October, Mrs. Mary Holder in April, Mr. T. J. Castevens in June, and Mrs. Annie Smith in July.

We shall welcome a visit to the Homes from our fellow Baptists at any time and stand ready at all times to render the service that God has called us to render to the aging.

Let it be known throughout the bounds of our fair State that there is nothing to hinder any needy aging person in our midst from coming to the North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging except lack of space. Let us, therefore, dedicate ourselves to the end of making more space available at the earliest possible moment.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The ministry of our Baptist Hospital touches every area of our state. Last year it served more than 17,000 bed patients, with 150,000 visits being made to the clinics and offices. They came for examinations, medical treatment, skilled surgery, and spiritual guidance. Many of our homes, most of our churches, and almost all of our communities have been served by this ministry of healing. It touches the family life of about a quarter of a million of our people each year.

Sickness is no respecter of persons or pocketbooks. It strikes the rich and poor alike — the widow, the orphan, the aged. There are times when they need such specialized care as that available at our Baptist Hospital. The Mother's Day Fund provides money with which our Hospital gives assistance to those who cannot pay the full cost of their care. Our Hospital almost doubles our gifts with matching funds from welfare agencies and other gifts. In addition to this, the medical staff gives its services without charge to all service patients, except for available insurance payments.

Probably we should ask ourselves if we as Christians should provide such a ministry for our needy, sick neighbors. Jesus and the New Testament writers give us the answer. But do we really want such a ministry? It cannot be provided except at great cost. Our Hospital receives about 3¼% of our Co-operative Program funds for payments on the buildings, purchase of expensive equipment, such as heart-lung machines, and for the Department of Pastoral Care. Our Mothers' Day Fund provides the money to help pay the hospital bills of needy, sick persons. The amount of this fund determines for the most part the amount of help our Hospital can give.

If we are serious about this ministry which was so close to the heart of our Lord, and want our Hospital to give help when our people need it, we are going to have to become serious about our giving to the Mother's Day Fund. Our Hospital is facing a grave financial problem, and if it is to give free service we are going to have to contribute the money to finance the program.

The only way we can support this work is to plan for it, to make somebody in each church responsible for it, to let our people know about the need, and to challenge them to give of their means. Some of our churches over the state have been doing this, and our people have demonstrated that when this is done they will provide the necessary support. We come to ask you to do it in your church — not for the hospital, but for sick people who are in need.

THE BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC. REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS — 1960

The Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Incorporated, is a multiple service agency providing Christian love and nurture for more than 800 deserving boys and girls annually.

The three homes are: Mills Home at Thomasville with 311 children, Kennedy Home at Kinston with 165, and Odum Home at Pembroke with 24 children.

There are 160 children in Foster Homes and 40 others who are assisted by Mother's Aid. Case work supervision is afforded 30 college students annually.

Children attend public school and participate in all school activities. Opportunities for Christian commitment and spiritual growth are afforded on the campuses, in the cottages, and through the Churches.

Relatives, pastors, social service agencies, and interested friends make inquiries about admission of children in need of care. When applications are received, well trained case workers make a thorough study of each situation to determine the need and the best possible plan of care for the child.

The Social Service Department of the Children's Homes affords case work services throughout the state. Individuals, families, pastors, and Churches are entitled to this help upon request.

The Baptist Child Care Program is supported through the Co-operative Program 31.5 per cent, Thanksgiving Offerings 31.1 per cent, Once-A-Month Offerings 21.9 per cent, Special Gifts and Endowment 15.5 per cent.

Income for the past three years has not been sufficient to meet minimum needs. Many children have been denied a Christian home whom we should have served. An increased Thanksgiving Offering is imperative this year.

North Carolina Baptists have been caring for homeless and dependent children for 75 years. Appropriate observance of the 75th Anniversary will be made in November. During these years, more than 8,000 children have been afforded life's best opportunities. The need for such services increases with the development of industry,

increase in population, growth of cities, and the mounting tensions which accrue to families in an urbanized society.

John E. Roberts became Editor of *Charity and Children* June 1, 1960. We envision under his editorship, this paper making an increasing contribution to the total life of our Baptist people.

North Carolina Baptists will continue to love and serve dependent children. No other object is so worthy of service and sacrifice. Many areas of unmet need confront us each day. Your continued interest and increasing support will help us meet them.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT (1959-1960)

Ten years ago this Association was organized. For nine years it was known as the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association and for one year as the Sandhills Baptist Association. Missionary Lee Pridgen was instrumental in bringing to the attention of the Association that the latter was more descriptive of the area than the former name. At the 191st session of the Sandy Creek Baptist Association in 1949, Rev. O. J. Hagler presented a petition asking that at the close of the session the following Churches be permitted to withdraw in order to form a new Association to be known as the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association: Aberdeen, Ashley Heights, Calvary, Cameron, Carthage, Ephesus, Flint Hill, Ives Memorial, Lemon Springs, Piney Wood, Pine Grove, Red Branch, Robbins, Southern Pines, Summer Hill, Taylor Memorial, and Vass. The petition was granted and the first meeting of the newly organized Association was held Tuesday, October 3, 1950, at Robbins and on Wednesday, October 4, at the Carthage Baptist Church, with Rev. Ottis J. Hagler as Moderator and J. D. Arey, Jr., as Clerk-Treasurer.

The 2nd Annual Meeting was held Thursday, October 18, 1951 at Southern Pines and Friday, the 19th, at Aberdeen, with Rev. O. J. Hagler as Moderator and H. N. Russell as Clerk-Treasurer.

The 3rd Annual Meeting was held at the New Home Baptist Church on Thursday, October 16, 1952, and at the Vass Baptist Church on Friday, the 17th, with Rev. W. C. Holland as Moderator and H. N. Russell as Clerk-Treasurer.

The 4th Annual Meeting was held Thursday, Oct. 15, 1953, at the Cameron Baptist Church and Friday, October 16, at the Flint Hill Baptist Church with Rev. L. M. Dixon as Moderator and H. N. Russell as Clerk-Treasurer.

The 5th Annual Meeting was held Thursday, October 14, 1954, at Ashley Heights and on Friday, the 15th, at the Calvary Baptist Church with Rev. O. J. Hagler as Moderator and H. N. Russell as Clerk-Treasurer.

The 6th Annual Meeting was held Thursday, October 13, 1955, at the Bethlehem Baptist Church and Friday, the 14th, at the Taylor Memorial Baptist Church with Rev. B. F. Deese as Moderator and Monroe Vaughn as Clerk-Treasurer.

The 7th Annual Meeting was held Thursday, October 18, 1956, at Aberdeen and on Friday, the 19th, at the Piney Wood Baptist Church with Rev. F. E. Deese as Moderator and H. N. Russell as Clerk-Treasurer.

The 8th Annual Meeting was held on Thursday, October 17, 1957, at Vass and on Friday, the 18th, at the Red Branch Baptist Church with Rev. E. T. Parham as Moderator and Dewitt Purvis as Clerk-Treasurer.

The 9th Annual Meeting was held Thursday, October 16, 1958, at Southern Pines and Friday, the 17th, at the Ephesus Baptist Church with Rev. E. T. Parham as Moderator and Dewitt Purvis as Clerk-Treasurer.

The 10th Annual Meeting was held Thursday night, October 15, 1959, at the Bethlehem Baptist Church. This was the first night session ever held in the Association. On Friday, the 16th, the meeting was held at the Robbins Baptist Church with Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr., as Moderator and Dewitt Purvis as Clerk-Treasurer.

In addition to the original 17 churches as recorded in the "History of Sandy Creek — 1858-1958", Bethlehem, New Home, Pleasant Hill, Robbins Cross Roads, Rosendale, Sandy Branch, Unity Grove, and West End have become members of the Association, according to the Minutes for 1959, making now a total of 25 churches in the Sandhills Baptist Association, not counting the Fairview Baptist Church which is to become a member this year.

W. C. Holland, Zeb A. Caudle, L. M. Dixon, E. T. Parham, R. L. Beal, D. H. Coon, Robert Woodson, W. Ray Gosnell, Maynard Mangum and Claude Connell were the Ministers who preached the "Introductory Sermons" at the Annual Meetings of the Association from 1950 through 1959.

The Executive Committee of the Association met at the Bethlehem Baptist Church on Nov. 30, 1959, at the West End Baptist Church on February 8, 1960, at the Ephesus Baptist Church on May 31, and again at West End Baptist Church on August 1.

The Promotion Committee of the Association met on November 30, 1959, February 8, 1960, March 14, May 31, June 12, and July 29. During April 1960 a check of \$100.00 was given to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Association in order to meet the amount needed for printing the Minutes. Also a donation of \$250.00 was given to the Fairview Baptist Church and a letter was sent to the Rosendale Baptist Church stating that the Committee would help them in their building program in their new location in so far as the Committee was able.

M-Night was held at the First Baptist Church of Carthage on December 7, 1959.

The Organizational Service of the Fairview Baptist Church, with some over 30 members, was held on January 31, 1960, at Doub's Chapel Methodist Church.

A Conference on Missions and Evangelism was held on March 1, 1960, at the First Baptist Church of Carthage.

The Annual Youth Night of the Association was held on April 9, 1960, at the First Baptist Church of Southern Pines.

The Annual Vacation Bible School Conference was held at the First Baptist Church of Carthage on May 3, 1960.

On Sunday afternoon, June 12, 1960, several members of the Promotion Committee, under the guidance of Missionary Lee Pridgen, were shown several prospective sites for the relocation of already organized Churches or the establishment of new Baptist Churches.

On July 7, 1960, a banquet was served in the Jefferson Inn at Southern Pines for the consideration of the promotion of Campbell College from a Junior College to a Senior College. The banquet and subsequent meeting was sponsored by the Executive Committee of the Sandhills Baptist Association and Campbell College.

The First Baptist Church of Aberdeen has improved their church grounds at a cost of approximately \$3,263.50 during the past year.

The Ashley Heights Baptist Church has a parsonage which enables their pastor, Rev. E. Paul West, Jr., to live in the community. During the past year a new heating plant has been installed in the parsonage, 25 new Baptist Hymnals have been bought for the Youth Choir, which together with a Young Men's Sunday School Class has been organized this past year. The Church also is in the process of organizing a Brotherhood.

The Bethlehem Baptist Church has a new Pastor, Rev. R. E. Poston, who lives in the community.

The Cameron Baptist Church has renovated their Nursery, seeded the lawns around both the parsonage and the church building and has bought a film strip projector. Their pastor, Charles T. Dorman, lives in their community.

The Carthage First Baptist Church has bought a new piano for their sanctuary.

The Ephesus Baptist Church, with their Pastor, Rev. Bernard A. Fallin, who lives on the field, has organized a Training Union. The Church has installed blackboards in every room and has put outside spotlights on the grounds.

The Flint Hill Baptist Church has finished their upstairs Sunday School rooms at a cost of \$161.50. A water cooler, plumbing supplies, a water pump and new pews have been added to their equipment, together with church guttering at a total estimated cost of \$1,296.69.

The Ives Memorial Baptist Church has replaced their Broadman Hymnals with new Baptist Hymnals. Circle No. 1 has donated pulpit and baptistry curtains. The Ida Combs circle has donated a brass vase for the altar table and an electric fan for the pulpit. The Sunday School wing has been completed and on September 4, 1960, it was dedicated in memory of their former pastor, Rev. W. Ray Gosnell. The total cost of the addition was \$7,395.51. Negotiations have been made to purchase a new lot which is at present to be used as a parking lot. The lot is located next to the church property on the western side.

The Lemon Springs Baptist Church has organized their Sunday School into a Departmental Sunday School. Also the church grounds have been improved.

The Pine Grove Baptist Church has their Pastor, Rev. Glenn Snider, now living in their community.

This past year the Piney Woods Baptist Church has received one for the Ministry and has added new song books to their equipment.

The Pleasant Hill Baptist Church has improved their church grounds during the past year.

Considerable work has been done on the Red Branch Baptist Church building. The roof has been recovered, the auditorium remodeled, the hardwood floor has been sanded and finished, new colored windows have been put in and new pews and pulpit furniture have been added; also the auditorium has been furnished with new recessed lights, at a total cost of \$6,815.39.

Rev. Lester English is the Pastor of the Rosendale Baptist Church. The Church is erecting a new building which is located on elevated ground near U. S. Highway No. 1. The Church has changed their name to Highland Baptist Church.

The First Baptist Church of Southern Pines has put up a lamp post style of light outside and has kept their lawn attractive by the annual planting of grass seed. The Church has also organized this year, 1960, a Chapter of the Royal Ambassadors.

The Summer Hill Baptist Church has built new rest rooms and finished and painted all the rooms in the basement at a total cost of \$4,000.00. Also new song books have been secured and a Sunday School organized at Reynolds Rest Home.

During the past year the Unity Grove Baptist Church has added hand rails to their front steps.

The Vass Baptist Church does not have a Pastor at present.

The West End Baptist Church suffered a great loss when their Pastor, Rev. Clifton Tuttle, who lives in the community, was in an accident at Dillon, S. C., on August 2, 1960, in which his wife was fatally injured.

The First Baptist Church of Robbins, during the past year, has licensed one of their number to preach the Gospel. The community is fortunate in having their Pastor, Rev. E. T. Parham, living in their community.

44. The report of the Program Committee was given by J. D. Ives and moved the adoption. Report adopted as read.

REPORT OF THE PROMOTION COMMITTEE (1959-1960)

The Promotion Committee met immediately after the Executive Committee Meeting in the Bethlehem Baptist Church on Nov. 30, 1959. The Treasurer's report that there was a Certificate of Deposit bearing 3 per cent interest dated April 1, 1959, of \$1,450.00, and that the Bank Book showed a balance of \$30.05.

On Feb. 8, 1960, the Committee met immediately after the meeting of the Executive Committee in the West End Baptist Church for a short conference in which they considered how they might help the newly organized Fairview Baptist Church.

On March 14, 1960, the Committee met in the First Baptist Church of Aberdeen. The Committee voted to pay \$250.00 to the Fairview Baptist Church as a donation, and \$100.00 towards the printing of the 1959 Minutes of the Association. The Rev. C. A. Kirby stated that the Carthage Baptist Church was not favorably inclined to continue the Mission Club as a Church project. Missionary Lee Pridgen suggested that it might be wise to continue the Mission Club as an individual project rather than as a Church project, thus donations might be given and available funds continue to come into the Treasury of the Promotion Committee for missionary purposes of the Sandhills Baptist Association, and it was so voted.

The Promotion Committee met on May 31, 1960, after the meeting of the Executive Committee at the Ephesus Baptist Church in order to choose a time when the Committee could go and see possible prospective sites for new Baptist Churches or the re-location of established Baptist Churches. The Treasurer reported a balance in the Treasury of \$1,174.15.

On June 12, 1960, several members of the Committee, led by Missionary Lee Pridgen, observed an excellent location for the Rosendale Baptist Church to relocate and build a new Church Building in

the Skyline area and adjacent to U. S. Highway No. 1. In the Pinehurst area several places were observed as possible sites for a new Baptist Church and the problem of securing a Church site in that general area was discussed.

On July 29, 1960, the Committee met at the Carthage Baptist Church and considered the budget for 1960-1961. After discussion the total budget that was proposed came to \$4,730.00 and on motion the Committee voted to present this proposed budget to the Association at its next Annual Meeting. After discussion it was determined that if every resident member would pay \$1.50 a year the amount in the proposed budget might be raised.

HISTORY OF FAIRVIEW BAPTIST CHURCH

More than three years ago, the Baptist people and others began to feel the need of a Baptist Church in the general area of Thomas' Cross Roads, and on the road leading from West End to Carthage. This feeling continued to grow along with the growth of the Community. Some were traveling six to eight miles to worship. Those going to Bethlehem had to travel a part of the way over unpaved roads. Some of the people had no means of transportation. A survey showed a large number of people not going to any church, many of which were not affiliated with any church; hence, the idea of establishing a place of worship near the people.

On November 13th, a group of interested citizens met at the home of Mr. George Booker to discuss the idea of a New Mission or church. All were of the same mind and had the same general feeling that the Lord was leading. After prayer, a motion was made and carried that we see how much money the people present were willing to give. \$9,000.00 was subscribed, payable on demand, and \$1,500.00 to be paid as soon as needed. Mrs. Elizabeth McDaniel offered to give her house to be used as a place of worship as long as needed. George Booker, Chester Turnage, Duke Boroughs, Lendo Seawell, Herbert Williamson and Willie Harris were appointed to select a suitable site. At the next meeting this Committee reported that three locations had been considered, but that the land offered by S. E. Hannon was unanimously agreed upon.

Those of the group belonging to Bethlehem Church informed the Church of their intention in November. However, it was agreed not to call for any letters until the end of the year.

On November 22, 1959, Mr. Lee Pridgen, our Associational Missionary, met with the group at the home of George Booker. He was concerned with perpetuating the name of Old Bethlehem and so were the members of the group. Following the suggestion of Mr. Pridgen a committee of four was appointed to meet with an equal number from the Bethlehem Church. This meeting was held the following week with Mr. Pridgen presiding, but no agreement was reached.

At the next meeting, on December 20th, plans for a new building

were discussed. It was decided to employ Williams S. Carpenter of Southern Pines as architect. Fairview was chosen as the name of the new church. A motion was made and approved that those of the group who were members of Bethlehem call for letters of dismissal on December 27, 1959. This was done and thirty-two letters were granted to join the New Church.

On the first Sunday in January, 1960, a new Sunday School was organized in Mrs. McDaniel's house with S. E. Hannon acting as Superintendent. The first sermon was preached by our Associational Missionary on the fourth Sunday in January from the text "For Me to Live Is Christ". At that, plans were made of the formal organization of the new church on the Fifth Sunday in January. Doubs Chapel Methodist Church graciously opened her doors to us, thus assuring us of ample room for the service.

THE ORGANIZATIONAL SERVICE FOR FAIRVIEW BAPTIST CHURCH

An Organizational Service for Fairview Baptist Church was held at the Doubs Chapel Methodist Church, Sunday, January 31, 1960, at 2:30 p.m.

The meeting was opened by Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr., leading a hymn "All Hail Jesus' Name", with Mrs. W. K. Carpenter, Jr., at the piano. The meeting was called to order by our Associational Missionary, Rev. Lee Pridgen.

Dewitt Purvis, our Associational Clerk, called the roll of the Churches, finding the following represented: Aberdeen, Ashley Heights, Bethlehem, Calvary, Cameron, Carthage, Ives Memorial, New Home, Piney Woods, Southern Pines, Taylor's Memorial, Unity Grove and West End. Eight Pastors and 23 deacons were present from these Churches.

The history of the New Church was read by Mr. George Booker. Motion was made by T. L. Moses that we proceed in the Organizing of this Church; this was seconded by W. Watt Norris; this was carried.

A Congregational song, "My Hope Is Built," was then sung.

Scripture and prayer were offered by Rev. C. A. Tuttle, reading all of the first chapter of Ephesians.

Rev. Claude Connell delivered the Organizational Sermon. Rev. Maynard Mangum read the articles of faith. The group accepted it. Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr., read the Church Covenant. The group accepted it.

The group were all called to the front for the Organizational Prayer. This prayer was offered by Rev. Bruce Christopher. The right hand of Church Fellowship was then given by all pastors, deacons and visitors.

The doors of the New Church were opened with three members coming from other Churches, the following were Mr. Duke Boroughs, Mrs. Elizabeth McDaniel and Mr. Herbert Williams.

The group named the following officers: Mr. S. E. Hannon, Moderator; Mrs. Sallie Horner, Clerk; Mr. George Booker, Treasurer. Board of Trustees were Mr. Lendo Seawell, Mr. Duke Boroughs and Mr. Herbert Williams.

Motion was then made by Mr. Lendo Seawell that the Church be named "Fairview Baptist Church", which was seconded and carried.

It was moved and seconded that all members accepted into the Church through the first Sunday in April, 1960, be Charter Members. Motion then was made by Mr. George Booker that 15% of all offering go to Missions, and that 15% of the offering today go to the Associational Mission. This was seconded and carried.

The ground breaking service was called off, due to bad weather, until a later date.

It was announced that this Church would have service each Sunday morning at 10:00 o'clock and Prayer Meeting each Thursday night.

The meeting closed with singing the hymn "The Church's One Foundation", followed by the benediction by Mr. S. E. Hannon.

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CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Sandhills Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of co-operating Missionary Baptist Churches within the area served by the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to the Committee on Reception of Churches, which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith and practice. Upon a favorable report and recommendation of the committee and favorable vote of the Association, the church shall be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

The application of an established Missionary Baptist Church, co-operativie member of an adjacent Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, shall upon recommendation of that Association, upon favrable recommendation of our Committee on Reception of Churches, and upon favorable vote of this Association, be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

Churches making application for membership in this Association between annual meetings may be voted on and admitted to full membership by a majority vote of the Executive Committee after investigation, approval and recommendation of the Committee on Reception of Churches.

Section 3. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

Section 4. Any church may withdraw membership from this Association at its pleasure.

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association; (2) all Pastors of member churches; (3) the members of all standing committees of the Association. The aforesaid officers, Pastors and standing committee members shall constitute messengers at large of the Association. Messengers at large are not elected by the churches and are not to be certified as messengers by their home churches. They are mssengers of the Association to the meeting of the Association by virtue of their connection with

and status in the Association as officers of the Association, Pastors of member churches or by membership on a standing committee of the Association. These messengers at large may be certified by the Clerk-treasurer. They may attend all meetings of the Association and exercise all rights and privileges of duly elected messengers. (4) Three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred, and one additional messenger for each additional fifty members or major fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to elect more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger or messenger at large who is not a member of a church which is a co-operating member of the Association. Messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

B. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the officers, Pastors, members of standing committees, as messengers at large of the Association, and the duly elected messengers or their alternates present.

Section 3. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power to infringe on any of the internal rights of the individual churches. It may advise with the member churches and recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance and may claim for its objects and programs the highest consideration.

ARTICLE V. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Historian, and three Trustees. The officers shall be elected at the annual meetings and installed during the afternoon session of the second day. They shall assume their duties immediately after installation and continue in office until their successors are installed. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one-year terms in succession.

Section 2. Departments. The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Baptist Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, and the Department of Church Music. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary to the Association. The Department heads shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Committees. There shall be the following standing committees: Committee on Committees, Committee on Resolutions, Committee on Reception of Churches, Committee on Place and Preacher, Committee on Ordinations, Program Committee, Executive Committee, Promotion Committee, and Committee on Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 4. Employees. The Missionary and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole Program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction and be subject to the authority of the Executive Committee. They shall be nominated by the Promotion Committee and elected by the Executive Committee or the Association, in Annual Session.

ARTICLE IV. REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

BY-LAWS

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following By-Laws:

ARTICLE I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The **Moderator** shall preside over the sessions of the Association and see that order and decorum are observed by everyone present. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

Section 2. The **Vice-Moderator** shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the **Clerk-Treasurer**:

(1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.

(3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.

(4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association. Disbursement shall be made in accordance with the budget adopted by the Association. Non-budgeted items must be approved by the Executive Committee.

(5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the **Historian** to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

Section 5. The **Trustees** shall hold title to all property of the Association. When authorized by the Executive Committee of the Association, they shall execute notes secured by mortgages and deeds

of trust in the purchase of church sites or other property. The Trustees in all acts with respects to property purchases shall be controlled and directed by the Association through its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Committee on Committees, consisting of five members, shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee on Committees shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 2. The Program Committee, which shall consist of three members, shall plan well in advance the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the Annual Meeting.

Section 3. The Committee on Reception of Churches, composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrines, practices, and co-operation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement on its findings along with its recommendations shall be submitted to the Association in Annual Session, or to the Executive Committee as provided herein in Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution.

Section 4. The Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

Section 5. The Committee on Place and Preacer, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of meeting and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 6. The Committee on Ordination, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations, as it feels led, to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 7. The Nominating Committee, consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations for each office of the Association to the Annual meeting of the Association.

Section 8. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It

shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall hold quarterly meetings at times and places determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the event that regular members cannot attend Executive Committee Meetings.

Section 9. The Promotion Committee shall consist of nine members with the Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer acting as ex-officio members. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Missionary, to devise ways and means, recommend measures, and initiate action, implementing promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association. It shall receive and disburse all Mission Club Funds. This committee shall, at the Executive Committee meetings, bring regular reports regarding receipts, disbursements, progress made, and future plans for our Associational Missions Program.

ARTICLE III. PROCEDURE

All business shall be conducted and all discussions shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS

of the

TWELTH ANNUAL SESSION

of the

SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Aberdeen Baptist Church, Aberdeen, N. C.

Thursday Night, October 12, 1961

1. The Sandhills Baptist Association was called to order for its 12th annual session at 7:00 p.m., October 12, by R. D. Spear, Jr., Moderator. The opening hymn was "Onward Christian Soldiers," Mrs. J. F. Swaim at the piano. Rev John Hales led the devotional period reading Timothy 1:1-8, and Romans 1:8 17. He also led in prayer.

2. The Clerk reported that 165 messengers from 22 churches had registered. This included 9 pastors and 4 visitors. Motion was made and passed that those present and those to come constitute the 12th annual session of the Sandhills Baptist Association

3. W. E. Kivette, Chairman of the Program Committee, moved the adoption of the Printed Program held by the messengers with such changes as might be necessary as the order of business.

4. The new pastor in the Association, John Hales of Vass, was recognized and welcomed into the Association. Two other new pastors, Amos Garner of Flint Hill and Frank Dennis of Pine Grove were not present.

5. Special music was offered by the Aberdeen Choir.

6. The Associational report was given by Missionary Lee Pridgen, which included a film strip about our Baptist work.

INTRODUCTORY STATEMENT

When in 1883 The Baptist State Convention was founded in Greenville a statement of Purpose was put in the Constitution. This purpose was set forth clearly in these words: "The Promotion of Missions, Education, Social Service, and the Distribution of Sound Literature."

In like manner the Sandhills Association declares in the Preamble to its Constitution: "We, the Missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an Association of Churches in order to promote Fellowship, Missions, Education, Christian Service and the Preaching of the Gospel . . .

In this Associational Report an effort is made to survey the agencies and Institutions we as Baptists are supporting. We look at them in the light of what we committed ourselves to do . . . in light of our stated purpose and aim as a body, and more, in the light of the Life and Teaching of our

Master.

WORLD MISSIONS

Jesus committed to His disciples a stupendous task. Beginning there in Jerusalem His message was to be proclaimed in all the world. No less than the conquest of, and the Christianization of, the whole world with all its races and tongues, was the ultimate end toward which they were to aggressively move. They were to witness on every road, detouring around none because of its roughness; preach in every area, by-passing none because of race or color. Such was the task committed to them. Such is the task Baptists have freely shouldered and accepted.

Jesus seemed to be apprehensive that His disciples would misunderstand what He meant by "The field is the world", so He took care to point out the areas of the world . . . "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the Uttermost parts of the world". They were to begin at home, establish a base there, and completely occupy it, setting up a Christian community with newly won disciples formed into a church. Thus grouped together they were to perennially witness, and hold the ground occupied. From time to time Missionaries were to be sent out into the small towns and villages in Judea, in Samaria, across the seas. While advancing in distance they were to keep expanding and strengthening the home base. Thus the pattern of World Missions as set forth by Christ was: Jerusalem, then Judea, then Samaria, and then the uttermost parts of the world.

This is the clear pattern Baptists are committed to today. We look upon the vital importance of Associational Missions. In the Sandhills Association our bases must be strengthened. Missionary fires must burn here so that they may warm others . . . and ever we must remember that the brighter the light of Christ here, the farther it will shine . . . The Kingdom of God Must be advanced from Jerusalem . . . from here.

Then there is our State Missions work. Cooperating together we must carry the message to needy areas of the State.

Beyond the State is our Home Mission Work, and beyond Home Mission work is Foreign Missions.

The disciple is not greater than his Lord. The disciple is to follow the pattern of his Master in all matters. This we believe Baptists are determined to do in World Missions.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Many of our great leaders today attribute the Baptist growth and success to 3 things: Missions, Evangelism, and Christian Education. It is so true that down through the years Baptists have been conscious of the supreme need for Christian Schools. Pastors, Missionaries, and lay leaders must be highly trained, and we need Baptist Schools to train them. So in 1834, one year after the Convention was organized, Wake Forest College was founded. A few years later (1848) Chowan was opened; Mars Hill began in 1856, Campbell in 1887, Wingate in 1896, Meredith in 1899 and Gardner Webb in 1907.

THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

It is difficult to appraise the real value of the American Bible Society. The tremendous task of the distribution of the Bible throughout the whole world is too big for one denomination, so the American Bible Society, supported by all the denominations assumes this job. Gifts from the churches make possible the free distribution of tracts, Gospel, Testaments, and Bibles to members of the armed services, prisons and other correctional institutions. Just recently we were able to help Leonard Training School at McCain secure more than 200 copies of the New Testament FREE to distribute to the boys in the school.

"The Bible is the Missionary's chief tool. He uses it in every form of Mission work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go; it can stay on after he must leave, and keep on speaking to a man's heart", — Bulletin of The Society.

THE BIBLICAL RECORDER

The Baptists of North Carolina early in their history became convinced that it was impossible to succeed in their work and hold together without a religious journal. In the year 1833 at the request of the Convention, Rev. Thomas Meredith started "**The Interpreter**" which was 2 years later changed to the "**Biblical Recorder**". Today the circulation of **The Recorder** has reached the all-time high of 78,000, and by 1964 the goal of 100,000 should be realized.

Through the years you people have looked upon **The Recorder** as "A brave true herald going before Baptist hosts, never wavering, nor ever giving an uncertain sound . . ." as an able defender of the faith . . . "as a faithful watchman on the ramparts of our denomination". **The Recorder** keeps Baptists informed, it aids in the development of our churches, and brings untold blessings to our homes. It is the connecting link among Baptists, and has always had much to do with our unity and prosperity.

The Recorder should be in every Baptist home.

THE CHILDREN'S HOMES

Our Orphanages, known today as **The Children's Homes**, have always been close to the hearts of North Carolina Baptists. It is one of our oldest ministries, and down through the years thousands of boys and girls have been blessed and prepared for Christian citizenship and service through this Institution.

The Children's Homes provide institutional care, foster home care, aid for dependent mothers, and counseling services for families in distress. In these Homes homeless children are given Christian Love, Affection, food, clothing and shelter, medical care, healthful recreation, vocational guidance, music instruction, and numerous other benefits.

More than 800 children are receiving care in one of the above mentioned areas, while 500 other children who could not be admitted to the Homes were helped to find homes in which to live.

The Children's Homes share in the Cooperative Program receipts, but every Thanksgiving Season special love offerings over and above are made by the churches and Sunday Schools to support this ministry.

THE HOSPITAL

In 1922 The Baptist State Convention established the Baptist Hospital in Winston Salem as a Missionary Enterprise. Baptist people with a desire to promote a total Christian Ministry reasoned that Christ gave much of His time to the healing of the sick, and furthermore He directly enjoined His followers to "Heal the sick."

To some of us who have been patients in the Hospital, have walked through the halls, visited in all parts of the huge plant, there is a feeling that possibly as in no other institution does one find so clearly demonstrated the three-fold ministry of Christ . . . Teaching, Preaching, Healing. The poor come from all over the state and are admitted though they have nothing with which to pay for their treatment.

Each year the Hospital continues to extend its ministry. The 79 bed minimal care building, with each room named after an Association, is now open.

The Hospital operates the largest Diploma School of Nursing in North Carolina, and it teaches and trains hundreds of young people in highly specialized fields such as Nurses, Doctors, Technicians, Chaplains, and Pastor-Counselors.

Only through generous support of the Hospital through our Mother's Day Offerings can it render effective service to those unable to pay. Mr. Tilden Cheek, our Hospital Representative, reports that in the Sandhills Association this year our offerings went far beyond those of former years.

THE HOMES FOR THE AGING

The youngest ministry of North Carolina Baptists is that care being provided for the Aging in our denomination. Though only initiated about 11 years ago, already Baptists have reached out in this service till today we have 3 Homes, Resthaven, Headquarters, Albemarle, with about 120 residents, A fourth home, The Hamilton, will soon make it possible to admit many of the 80 applicants now on the waiting list.

The support for the Baptist Homes for the Aging comes from three sources: The Cooperative Program, Receipts from the Special February Love Offering in the Churches, and designated gifts.

DEPARTMENTS OF THE ASSOCIATION

In our Association we have four Departments — the same as the local church. These are sometimes called "Arms of the Church" for through them the church reaches out into areas of vital work. The Womans Missionary Union is Auxiliary to the Association.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday School is the Bible Teaching Arm of the Church. We are happy to report that every church in the Sandhills Association has a Sunday

have been started in some schools, with increased enrollment and attendance

The Vacation Bible School in the summer is a vital link in the total teaching effort of the Sunday School. This past year, as each year, a Conference for all local church Bible School workers was held in Carthage with some 90 in attendance. Many of the churches reported the best all around Bible School this year in the history of the church.

Mr. Brady Brooks is Superintendent of the Sunday School Department in the Association.

THE TRAINING UNION

The Training Union as the name implies is the Training Arm of the Church. Not every church in the Association has a Training Union. We would surely like to see this goal realized. Last year 1152 were enrolled in the 19 Training Unions in the Association.

The Training Union sponsors two important gatherings during each year. In December there is the "M" Night with all the interest it stimulates, and in April there is YOUTH Night.

Rev. James Clayton is Director of the Training Union Department of the Association.

THE BROTHERHOOD

The 1960-1961 Associational Year was significant for Brotherhood work in our Association and in North Carolina. On October 1, 1960 a new plan of organization went into effect. It now appears that every Brotherhood in the State is organized on this new plan. The Royal Ambassador Program is undergoing a change in organization also, plans are underway to develop a State R. A. Camp on a selected site near Asheboro.

This year in the Sandhills Association several new Brotherhoods have been started under the live promotional effort of the Associational President Joe Lennon. We now have 8 organizations. Two Retreats on Christian Witnessing were promoted with Mr. Gary Harthcock of the Department of Evangelism in Raleigh, leading the group discussions.

CHURCH MUSIC

Nothing is more vital and important in the life of the Church than good music. It is the aim of this Department to promote better Church Music not only in the worship service but in all areas of the church life.

In the year ahead we look forward to having the leadership of Rev. Maynard Mangum as Director of the Department of Church Music and Mrs. W. K. Carpenter, Jr., who will be associated with him as pianist. Mr. Mangum has suggested one thing he definitely hopes to promote during the year ahead. . . that is an Associational Hymn Sing. We look forward to this with joy.

9. W. E. Kivette made a report on Christian Education, and moved its adoption. The report was adopted. He introduced James P. Morgan, who spoke on Advance in Christian Education.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

A special Baptist group was appointed in November, 1959 of 20 pastors and laymen, representing ten regions in North Carolina to investigate the possibilities of "Advance Christian Education among our colleges.

At our annual State Convention in November, 1960, the committee presented a recommendation calling for proposals to strengthen the seven Baptist Colleges; namely: (1) Campbell College; (2) Chowan College; (3) Gardner-Webb College; (4) Mars Hill College; (5) Meredith College; (6) Wake Forest College; and (7) Wingate College.

The committee conservatively estimated that our seven colleges, consisting of 8,000 students, would increase in the years from 1961-1970 to an anticipated growth of 16,00 enrollment. They also recommended an outline for funds needed to care for proposed students.

The Baptist State Convention — special session on May 4, 1961 endorsed a minimum program calling for a 35% increase in cooperative gift program over its present cooperative church programs during each of the next fiscal years —1962 - 1963 - 1964.

The investigating committee also recommended that Campbell College and Mars Hill College proceed along the lines of converting from two-year to four-year institutions. This proposal was previously adopted.

In August, 1959, the trustees of Campbell College voted to venture on a needed program to increase facilities at Campbell to take care of the influx in students already standing at its doors. They projected a financial fund raising program goal of two million dollars within three years.

Most of you people in the Sandhills Baptist Association already know that I have been honored as one of the Campbell College trustees for the third 5-year term.

This Christian co-educational institution started its first four-year advance college assignments on September 11, 1961 with sixteen additional faculty members approved by the trustees.

During the past two years, our entire college administration has secured many substantial gifts from numbers of Christian friends throughout our fine state. The physical results in our educational facilities are listed in order that you may know our accomplishments.

\$1,039,223.00 in gifts and pledges have been received since our two million program started. Paid gifts and pledges amount to \$398,000.00 so far with the balance pledged to be paid within three years.

We would like to report the following improvements at Campbell College:

(1st) The Rich Memorial Library (built 1925) has been improved to

- handle an additional 200 students at a cost of \$120,000.00.
- (2nd) The Pearson Memorial Infirmary Building, costing \$77,000.00, has been erected and has adequate space for 16 students.
- (3rd) The James E. and Mary Z. Bryan, new Dormitory for women, space for 72 additional girls has been erected at a cost of \$280,000.
- (4th) The new James A. Campbell Memorial Administration Building was built with space for business offices at cost of \$190,000.00
- (5th) The new Science Building, now under construction, must be ready by August, 1962 with a floor space of 44,000 feet This will provide for new types of training in science not previously offered. Construction costs not to exceed \$250,000.00.
- (6th) In 1959-1960 the new Married Student Housing Apartments — 24 units — was erected at a cost of \$165,000.00.
- Campbell College enrollment growth: From 987 students in 1959
to 1,216 students in 1960
to 1,428 students in 1961

The 1959 book value of the physical plant of Campbell College was \$2,639,000.00. The growth value now stands at \$4,410,965.00.

Our 1959-60 Moore County Campbell College campaign contributed pledges and gifts amounting to \$20,855.00 toward our proposed goal of \$50,000.00 to this date. "Allow me to personally thank the Moore County people."

"Spiritual education begins the day of your birth. It affects every type of your thought and conduct. It provides information and establishes ideals. It forms social standards, controls moral sensitivity, and directs loyalties. Your education cultivates all your interests, shapes your motives, and guides your devotions."

15. Rev. Maynard Mangum introduced Rev. William Pool, Superintendent of the Baptist Homes for the Aged, who spoke on these institutions.

16. Rev. Maynard Mangum spoke briefly concerning our Orphanage Home in Thomasville, now called our Children's Home. He moved the adoption of this report. The report was accepted.

17. Rev. J. C. Haliburton, Chairman of 'Evangelism, spoke on "Goals and Aims in Evangelism for 1961-1962" and moved the adoption. The report was adopted.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

These are tremendous days in which we live. Billions are being spent for getting men to the moon, while comparatively little is spent for getting men to God. Multitudes sit in darkness and many in despair while the forces of darkness move constantly in a dedicated abandon toward their objectives. The number of hopeless people — hopeless because they do not know Christ — grows daily. The world's population is increasing by 48,000,000 per year. All religious efforts are winning only 10,000,000 per year, leaving 38,000,000 people each year lost without God.

Many of these lost people live within the territory of our Association. In fact many live near our Baptist Churches. In regard to their need for God these unsaved people have been deluded by the powers of darkness, and numbers of them are disillusioned by the lack of dedication to Christ on the part of professing Christians. In this desperate day God's people must wake up to the fact that "business as usual" will not suffice. Surely this is the time for total dedication to Christ in his purpose of winning the multitudes to God.

Our Churches would resent the implication that we are not evangelistic. But upon an objective analysis this indictment is valid; for evangelism implies a proclamation, a witnessing of the news of God's intervening in human history in the person of Jesus Christ. To bring people to grips with God by the means of personal encounter with Christ is our opportunity and obligations as Christians. For it is profoundly true that God deals with individuals on a personal basis. We are so important to God that he demands the right to deal personally with us, so evangelism becomes the task of individual Christians.

Sandhills Baptist Churches this year reported a total of 183 people who united with a church in this association as a result of their personal faith in Christ. This comparative small number in proportion to the total church membership, our potential force, is possibly related to the fact that many individual church members are failing in their responsibility as soul-winners.

To move forward in the coming year, we will have opportunity each day to speak a good word for Jesus, to talk more about the things of supreme importance — a man's relation to God. Can we not devote ourselves to this supreme work of making Christ known to the people in our communities and the world? Surely this is the challenge of every true Christian in evan-

gelism.

Therefore, it is recommended:

- 1—That we encourage ourselves in the Lord our God for the resurging interest in evangelism across our convention, praying that God may work in us and through us to bring the revival we need.
- 2—That our Association have an Evangelistic Clinic following the suggested program supplied by the Division of Evangelism. The date for our Clinic as suggested by our State Department of Evangelism is February 8, 1962.
- 3—That each Church plan at least two revivals each year.
- 4—That each Church send its pastor to the annual State-wide Conference on Evangelism.
- 5—That a Church Council on Evangelism, or some method of promoting Evangelism, be set up in each Church.

29. Brady Brooks made a report of our Sunday Schools in our Association,

and moved its adoption. Report adopted.

30. James L. Clayton made a report on the Training Unions of our Association, and moved its adoption. Report adopted.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

During the year two Associational meetings were held for the Training Union. On December 5th "M" Night was observed at Calvary Church with 326 persons present. The Attendance Banner was won by Lemon Springs showing that it was the third year for the attendance record.

On April 8th Youth Night was observed at Aberdeen Church with Dr. J. B. Willis as guest speaker.

Another "M" Night is being planned for this year.

There are 17 churches with Training Unions with 1012 combined enrollment. There are 9 churches without Training Unions.

Last year total enrollment of 16 churches was 1152 with average attendance of 692. This year the reports show a decline of 140 in enrollment and 73 in average attendance.

This shows that there is still much work needing to be done along the lines of training.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT (1960 - 1961)

The Executive Committee of the Association held its meeting on Oct. 31, 1960 at the Calvary Baptist Church, on Feb. 6, 1961 at the Cameron Baptist Church, on May 1, at the Fairview Baptist Church, and on July 31 at the Highland Baptist Church.

The Promotion Committee of the Association held its meeting on Jan. 10, 1961 at the First Baptist Church of Southern Pines and on June 8th. at the Carthage Baptist Church. At the Carthage meeting it was agreed to present to the Association at its annual meeting in October 1961 a total budget for 1961-1962 of \$5,850.00.

On Nov. 22, 1960 a Sunday School Workers Conference was held at the First Baptist Church of Southern Pines.

The Training Union "M-Night" was held on Monday night, Dec. 5, 1960 at the Calvary Baptist Church.

The Annual Associational Evangelistic Conference was held at the First Baptist Church of Carthage on Feb. 21, 1961 with Dr. Leroy Parker as the scheduled speaker.

A "Youth Night" service was held at the First Baptist Church of Aberdeen on April 8, 1961, with Dr. J. B. Willis of Hamlet as the guest speaker.

A "Fellowship Service" was held on Apr. 9, 1961 at the new home of the Highland Baptist Church (formerly known as the Rosendale Baptist Church.)

A Vacation Bible School Conference was held at the First Baptist Church of Carthage on April 20, 1961.

An Associational Brotherhood Planning Meeting was held at the Taylor's cottage which is located on the southern shore of the Aberdeen Lake, on Saturday evening, April 29, 1961.

A special Fellowship Service was held at the Fairview Baptist Church on Sunday afternoon, June 18, 1961.

The monthly meetings of the Pastor's Conference met at the First Baptist Church of Carthage at 10 a.m. on the Monday following the first Sunday of each month. Missionary Lee Pridgen states that these meetings were well attended and undoubtedly the spiritual wellbeing of the Association has been greatly influenced by these meetings.

On Saturday, June 10th., and again on June 24, 1961, from 2:30 until 8:00 P.M. a number of Laymen and Preachers held a "Laymen's Retreat" at a cottage by Aberdeen Lake. Joe Lennon was instrumental in securing Gary Harthcock of the State Department of Evangelism to conduct the meetings. Each one present was given a printed outline for study, which in itself was well worth one's attendance. After supper the discussions were

resumed and finally a challenge was given to all Christians to realize more fully the need of God's guidance in world affairs.

The "5th Anniverstry Home Coming" of the new First Baptist Church of Aberdeen, which was scheduled to occur on Sept. 24., was postponed until Oct. 1, 1961 due to conflicts in the schedules of their former Pastors. This gathering represented the half-way point in paying off their indebtedness on a ten-year note which was made in 1956. Two of their former Pastors, Chaplain Eugene Deese of Fort Benning, Georgia, and Rev. Zeb Caudle of Peachland, N. C., had a part on the program. It was a very enjoyable occasion for the Church and its many friends. For all who attended a bountiful dinner was served in the recreation room.

The Ashley Heights Baptist Church has organized a Brotherhood and has put a new roof on their church building during this past year.

During the past year the Bethlehem Baptist has added baptismal robes and file cabinets to their equipment. The Church has also begun construction of an educational building.

The Cameron Baptist Church has seeded both the Parsonage as well as the Church lawns. A new roof has been put on the Parsonage, a back porch has been added and new cabinets in both the kitchen and bath room have been installed. Long folding dining tables for both the Church basement and the dining area have been purchased this year.

The Ephesus Baptist Church has bought a new piano for their Church this year.

Though the building of the Fairview Baptist Church is not completed yet, 5 Sunday School rooms are finished to the extent that they are being used each Sunday. The Sanctuary has been floored, a Pulpit erected and seats secured for the Auditorium. The building and grounds have been landscaped with parking space, with walks and the lawn has been seeded. Rev. James Clayton became their first Pastor and the first Service was held by Rev. Clayton on Jan. 15, 1961 in Mrs. McDaniel's house. On Easter Sunday, April 12, 1961, the Congregation moved into the new Church Building. The Church held its first Revival Services in April 1961. In the immediate future a heating plant is to be installed, the auditorium ceiled, two more Sunday School rooms finished and an Entrance Porch with columns is to be erected.

The Flint Hill Baptist Church has nearly completed a Fellowship Hall at a present cost of \$2,658.45. The Church has called Rev. Amos Garner to be their new Pastor.

The Ives Memorial Baptist Church, during this past year, has organized a Brotherhood and the planning fo a Royal Ambassador program has begun. Both a Junior and an Intermediate Girl's Auxiliary has been organized.

Rev. Frank Dennis is the new Pastor of the Pine Grove Baptist Church.

This year the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church has installed an electric pump and plans have been made to add a wing to the church building in which there are to be three new Sunday School rooms. A small plot of land adjoining the church property has also been purchased during this past year.

During this past year the Red Banch Baptist Church has entered the ranks of the full time Churches of the Association. A new carpet at a cost of \$950.00 has been put down, 50 new Broadman Hymnals at a cost of \$75.00 have been purchased, a new vacuum cleaner has been bought at a cost of \$50.00 also a wheelbarrow and canvass has been bought at a cost of \$45.00.

The first meeting of the newly organized Brotherhood was held at the Robbins First Baptist Church on March 15, 1961 with Joe Lennon helping with the Organizational Service. The resignation of Rev. E. T. Parham took place on August 26, 1961 and Rev. Robert C. Briggs of Wake Forest is their supply Pastor.

The First Baptist Church of Southern Pines has licensed two men for the ministry, Mr. John Chappell who is a student at the Southeastern Seminary and Mr. Walter O'Neal who is a student at Wake Forest College. A Brotherhood, an R. A. Chapter and "Friends" for the 8-year-old Sunbeam group have been organized. An area flood light has been installed, a brick wall laid, the educational building floor refinished and a new carpet on the aisles of the Sanctuary has been obtained during this past year.

The Unity Grove Baptist Church has bought a new piano for their auditorium .

The West End Baptist Church has organized a Brotherhood and a Royal Ambassadors Chapter. Two Sunday School rooms have been completed and a nice lot just across the street from the Church has been donated by Mrs. Fred VonCanon. It is planned by the Church to erect a recreational building on it. Their Pastor, Rev. Clifton Tuttle, gave a nice projector and screen to the W.M.U. in honor of the memory of his wife who at the time of her death was President of the W.M.U. Also a carpet fund has been started by the Church as a memorial to Mrs. Tuttle.

The Vass Baptist Church has Rev. John Hales as their new Pastor.

Woman's Missionary Union is deeply concerned about our world, today, and our business is missions, beginning at home and reaching to the uttermost parts of the earth. A small boy looking at "The Golden Geography" with his Grandmother came to a map of the world. "What's this?" he asked. "It's the world, Bill", his Grandmother said. "What's it like?" he asked. This is a good question. Our world, as God made it, is a wonderful and beautiful world but let's think for a few minutes just what our world is like, today.

First, it's a small world, made by rapid transportation, radio and television. Then, it's a crowded world. More people are born every year than die. This is due to several things — among them medical discoveries and improved health through sanitation. We hear much about "population explosion." It's a turbulent world. We only have to pick up the paper any day

to be brought face to face with this fact. It is a tense and fearful world. Communism has made unbelievable strides with a promise that is a cure for all ills. The Russian Leader has warned that "he will bury us". Then there is racial strife. Worst of all, our world is a lost world. More than two billion of the world's people are in the grip of sin and lay no claim to any Christian faith. Paganism is evident in all nations, including our own, which is obsessed with material possessions. With this knowledge, Woman's Missionary Union, in Sandhills Association, can do no less than to show forth God's redeeming love in Jesus Christ to a lost world.

This we propose to do through a knowledge of the missionary message of the Bible; world awareness — and awareness is first observation, then, insight on perception and finally participation; sharing possessions; a deepening prayer life; and witness in our community, which we call community missions. We need power to achieve this purpose but we have been promised the power — which is the Holy Spirit — by Jesus, himself.

Women, won't you who do not belong to WMS join now? WMS members, won't you rededicate yourselves to service? Let's all commit ourselves to putting missions first and helping our association to reach out "that the millions of the Whole Wide World may know our Saviour's love."

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CONSTITUTION and BY-LAWS

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Sandhills Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of co-operating Missionary Baptist Churches within the area served by the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to the Committee on Reception of Churches, which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith and practice. Upon a vote of the Association, the church shall be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

The application of an established Missionary Baptist Church, co-operative member of an adjacent Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, shall upon recommendation of that Association, upon favorable recommendation of our Committee on Reception of Churches, and upon favorable vote of this Association, be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

Churches making application for membership into this Association between annual meetings may be voted on and admitted to full membership by a majority vote of the Executive Committee after investigation, approval and recommendation of the Committee on Reception of Churches.

Section 3 The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

Section 4. Any church may withdraw for this Association at its pleasure.

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) the members of all standing committees of the Association. The aforesaid officers, pastors, and standing committee members shall constitute messengers at large of the Association. Messengers at large are not elected by the churches and are not to be certified as messengers by their home churches. They are messengers of the Association to the meeting of the Association by virtue of their connection with and status in the Association as officers of the Association, Pastors of member churches or by membership on a standing committee of the Association. These messengers at large may be certified by

the Clerk-Treasurer. They may attend all meetings of the Association and exercise all rights and privileges of duly elected messengers. (4) Three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred and on additional messenger for each fifty members or major fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to elect more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger or messenger at large who is not a member of a church which is a co-operating member of the Association. Messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

B. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the officers, Pastors, members of standing committee, as messengers at large of the Association, and the duly elected messengers of their alternates present.

Section 3. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power to infringe on any of the internal rights of the individual churches. It may advise with the member churches and recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance and may claim for its objects and programs the highest consideration.

ARTICLE V. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers. The Officers of the Association shall be moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk Treasurer, Historian and three Trustees. The officers shall be elected at the annual meetings and installed during the afternoon session of the second day. They shall assume their duties immediately after installation and continue in office until their successors are installed. The moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one year terms in succession.

Section 2. Departments. The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Baptist Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, and the Department of Church Music. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary to the Association. The Department heads shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Committees. There shall be the following standing committee on Committees, Committee on Resolutions, Committee on Reception of Churches, Committee on Place and Preacher, Committee on Ordinations, Program Committee, Promotion Committee, and Committee on Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 4. Employees. The Missionary and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole Program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction and be subject to the authority of the Executive Committee. They shall be nominated by the promotion Committee and elected by the Executive Committee or the Association, in Annual Session.

ARTICLE IV. REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two thirds of the messengers present provided that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following By-Laws.

BY-LAWS**ARTICLE I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1. The **Moderator** shall preside over the sessions of the Association and see that order and decorum are observed by everyone present. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

Section 2. The **Vice Moderator** shall preside at the pleasure of the moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator.

Section 3 It shall be the duty of the **Clerk-Treasurer**

- (1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.
- (3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
- (4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association. Disbursement shall be made in accordance with the budget adopted by the Association. Non-budgeted items must be approved by the Executive Committee.

(5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the **Historian** to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member Churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

Section 5. The **Trustees** shall hold title to all property of the Association. When authorized by the Executive Committee of the Association, they shall execute notes secured by mortgages and deeds of trust in the purchase of church sites or other property. The Trustees in all acts with respects to property purches shall be controlled and directed by the Association through its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. The **Committee on Committees**, consisting of five members, shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee on Committees shall

carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 2. The program Committee, which shall consist of three members shall plan well in advance the suggested program of them Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 3. The Committee on Reception of Churches, composed of three members, shall receive all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrines, practices, and co-operation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement on its findings along with its recommendations shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Executive Committee as provided herein in Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution.

Section 4. The Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

Section 5. The Committee on Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of meeting and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 6. The Committee on Ordination, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all Pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations, as it feels led, to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 7. The Nominating Committee, consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations for each office of the Association to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 8. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual session. The duties of this Committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall hold quarterly meetings at times and places determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive. A quorum shall be the representatives if a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the event that regular members cannot attend Executive

Committee Meetings.

Section 9. The Promotion Committee shall consist of nine members with the Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer acting as ex-officio members. It shall be the duty of this committee, co-operating with the Missionary, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action, implementing promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association. It shall receive and disburse all Mission Club Funds. This committee shall at the Executive Committee Meetings, bring regular reports regarding receipts, disbursements, progress made, and future plans for our Associational Missions Program.

ARTICLE III. PROCEDURE

All business shall be conducted and all discussions shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

Thursday Night, October 18, 1962

1. The Sandhills Baptist Association was called to order for its 13th annual session at 7:00 P.M., October 18, 1962 by W. E. Kivette, moderator. The opening period of worship was led by the host pastor, Rev. Maynard Mangum, assisted by the church choir.

2. The moderator, W. E. Kivette called upon Lee Pridgen, acting clerk in the absence of Dewitt Purvis to give a report on registration. He reported that eighty-one messengers from twenty-one churches had registered, with forty six visitors, being a total of one hundred twenty seven present. Motion was made and passed that those present and those to come constitute the 13th annual session of the Sandhills Baptist Association for the transaction of all business.

3. R. D. Spear, Jr., Chairman of the Committee on order of business was recognized by the moderator and presented the printed program, moved the adoption with added recommendation that it also be a memorial to Rev. M. D. Chrisco, pastor of Calvary Church, who had died in the Baptist Hospital today.

4. Rev. John Hales, pastor at Vass and president of the Pastor's conference introduced the new pastors. They were: Charles Moseley, Carthage church; William Medlin, Cameron church; E. L. Christy, Robbins church, Donald Bratton, Taylors Memorial and Fairview churches, R. T. Willis, Lemon Springs and Ephesus. The moderator welcomed them into the Sandhills Baptist Association.

5. The moderator, W. E. Kivette introduced John Smith, of Sanford, N. C., who spoke in behalf of the Baptist Foundation.

6. Mrs. W. B. Cole, president of W.M.U. presented her annual report.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION'S ANNUAL REPORT SANDHILLS ASSOCIATION

OCTOBER 1962

Our W. M. U. Watchword for the year is "Laborers together with God — that the world through Him might be saved . ." (I Cor: 3:9, John 3:17)

Nobody ever thought of talking about God's love before Christ came into

the world. It was once a new message but Christians have grown accustomed to these words and they do not sound strange in their ears today. Only the truth of them has grown dim in their hearts.

The watchword for this year combines three great and thrilling facts: God loves the world; man can have everlasting life before he dies; God has said to the Christian, "Come work with me and together we'll show the people of your day the way of salvation.

Among the world's population there are two billion people who have not experienced God's love. They live on every continent and in every nation. The Christian woman says she loves all the people of the world. She does not mean by that statement that she has any feeling about these millions individually; she has considered them in the masses. But God does not love this way. He loves all because he loves each. As Paul expressed it, "Who loved me and gave himself for me."

What is the Great Commission and the Lord's Command? "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." (Matthew 28: 91-20)

Every Christian is a believer in God and is an Ambassador for Christ. Charles Wesley expresses it in his hymn, "Oh, for a Thousand Tongues . . ."

O, for a thousand tongues to sing my great Redeemer's praise, The glories of my God and King, the triumphs of His grace.

My gracious Master and my God, assist me to proclaim, to spread through all the earth abroad the honors of Thy name.

Jesus! the name that charms our fears, that bids our sorrows cease, 'Tis music in the sinner's ears, 'Tis life and health and peace.

He breaks the power of canceled sin, He sets the prisoner free; His blood can make the foulest clean; His blood availed for me.

Hear Him, ye deaf; His praise, ye dumb, your loosened tongues employ; Ye blind, behold your Saviour come; and leap, ye lame, for joy.

In our world today one with Christ is a majority. Christian witnessing is first in quality in its relationship to Christ. Every Christian must witness first through living his Christianity. Then by telling the good news to others. We manifest God's power through each layman in our association. An example of God's power is seen in many ways. This story illustrates what we mean by the power of Christ being within us, then we can do all things.

Story: There was a sailor who without much money put together a small flimsy sailboat and was planning to sail over a hundred miles to Norfolk, Virginia. His friends said, "Bill, you will never make the trip to Norfolk in that boat. The current is too swift, the waves are too rough. It will not stand the test." Bill replied, "Yes, I will! I have a date with the great Gulf Stream and it flows that way." Do we have a date with the great power of God? Yes, we always do when we become Ambassadors for God. He has said, "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is

come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth." (Acts 1:8)

The Church extension program for 1962 is a concerted effort at home and on foreign fields to establish more churches and missions in order that more people may hear and understand the gospel of Christ. The 30,000 Movement had one objective: a total of 30,000 new churches and mission stations by the close of 1964. However, the actual objective of the movement is to have more places of worship in order that people who have been out of reach of the gospel may hear the good news and accept Christ as Lord and Saviour. This is in fact a missionary program.

Dr. Courts Redford, executive secretary of the Home Mission Board, writes: "Southern Baptists are a people of the Book. We believe the Bible. We have the gospel. We have the resources. We have the personnel. We have the churches . . . We have all that is needed except one thing — we need a wholehearted dedication of life and resources."

The women of the Sandhills Association have been doing God's work of missions. We have attended meetings more regularly, given more of our tithe to missions, been or ready to serve whenever and wherever to our best ability. As President of the W.M.U. in the Association, I have had the best of cooperation from our church officers and our associational officers. We realize we have not done as much as God expects, however, we are praying that we will do more for Christ in 1963.

During 1962 we have had many enlightening meetings, associational, district, and statewide. Our Mission Study Institute was held in January 1962 at Ephesus Church. To know missions we must read more about mission work. God said, "How shall they know unless they have a preacher?" In mission books we learn of the doctors, the nurses, the teachers, the preachers, and the missionaries in many lands.

On March 22, 1962 at Ashley Heights Church we had over 150 members present for our annual W.M.U. meeting. Mrs. Colon F. Godwin, Ghana, Africa and Jackson Springs, N. C., gave us a most inspirational talk and movie on mission work and life in Africa. Miss Deloris Hamrick, State Sunbeam Band Director, brought a message from our state W.M.U. office. She also stressed the importance of training our youngest (Sunbeams) in missions.

On September 14, 1962 at Vass Church we held a Stewardship Institute. The Stewardship emphasis for the year has been a definite effort to enlist the lives, talents, and resources of our women in carrying out the Great Commission of our Lord.

On September 25, 1962 at Southern Pines Church we had our Leadership Conference. We emphasized our Goals for 1963 which is our 75th Anniversary of the W.M.U. Associational officers of the W.M.U. presented a play stressing 75% increase in 1963 in reading more missions books, in reading

and subscribing to W.M.U. magazines, in holding leadership cards, giving 15% more in Lottie Moon offering, Annie Armstrong offering, 15% increase in tithers and in members, and that these goals can be a deepening of our spiritual lives. A most successful Leadership Conference.

Eleven members of our group in the Associational W.M.U. attended the State W.M.U. Convention in Asheville. One member attended the Southern Baptist Convention in San Francisco, California. Our quarterly meetings for business and planning have been well attended.

Our report for the year shows: 26 churches in the Association — 3526 members. 22 W.M.S. organizations — 561 members. 4 Y.W.A. organizations with 34 members. 19 G.A. organizations with 176 members. 20 Sunbeam organizations with 234 members. Total 1015 members. Every Christian is a believer in God and is an Ambassador for Christ. Members of all W.M.U. organizations.

New organizations: W.M.S. — 3; Y.W.A. — 0; G.A. — 3; Sunbeam — 0. 1 Honor Society — Carthage, and 3 advanced Societies: Bethlehem, Southern Pines, Aberdeen.

“Jesus Shall Reign” through missions, If we earnestly pray without ceasing for God to be known throughout the world. Two of our missionaries have said this about prayer:

Associational Report

INTRODUCTORY STATEMENT

In this Associational Report an effort is made to survey the agencies and Institutions we as Baptists are supporting. We look at them in the light of what we as Baptists have committed ourselves to do, and in the light of the life and teachings of our Master.

WORLD MISSIONS

Jesus committed to His disciples a stupendous task. Beginning there in Jerusalem His message was to be proclaimed in all the world. No less than the conquest of, and the Christianization of, the whole world with all its races and tongues, was the ultimate end towards which they were to aggressively move. They were to witness on every road detouring around none because of its roughness; preach in every area, by-passing none because of race or color. Such was the task committed to them. Such is the task Baptists have freely shouldered and accepted.

Jesus seemed to be apprehensive that His disciples would misunderstand what He meant by "The field is the world", so He took care to point out the areas of the world . . . "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the Uttermost parts of the world". They were to begin at home, establish a base there, and completely occupy it, setting up a Christian community with newly won disciples formed into a church. Thus grouped together they were to perennially witness, and hold the ground occupied. From time to time Missionaries were to be sent out into the small towns and villages in Judea, in Samaria, across the seas. While advancing in distance they were to keep expanding and strengthening the home base. Thus the pattern of World Missions as set forth by Christ was: Jerusalem, then Judea, then Samaria, and then the uttermost parts of the world.

This is the clear pattern Baptists are committed to today. We look upon the vital importance of Associational Missions. In the Sandhills Association our bases must be strengthened. Missionary fires must burn here so that they may warm others . . . and ever we must remember that the brighter the light of Christ here, the farther it will shine . . . The Kingdom of God must be advanced from Jerusalem . . . from here.

Then there is our State Missions work. Cooperating together we must carry the message to needy areas of the State.

Beyond the State is our Home Mission work, and beyond Home Mission work is Foreign Missions.

The disciple is not greater than his Lord. The disciple is to follow the pattern of his Master in all matters. This we believe Baptists are determined to do in World Missions.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Many of our great leaders today attribute the remarkable Baptist growth and expansion to three (3) things: Missions, Evangelism, and Christian Education. It is so true that down through the years Baptists have been conscious of the supreme need for Christian Schools. Pastors, Missionaries, and lay leaders must be trained, and trained highly. . and we need our schools to train them.

So in 1834, one year after the Convention was organized, Wake Forest College was founded. A few years later (1848) Chowan was opened; Mars Hill began in 1856, Campbell in 1887, Wingate in 1896, Meredith in 1899, and Gardner Webb in 1907.

Receipts from the Cooperative Program for these schools is presently being increased through special emphasis known as the Christian Education Advance Drive.

Coordination of the total program of Christian Education is through the Council on Christian Education. Mr. Ben Fisher is the new Secretary.

THE BIBLICAL RECORDER

The Baptists of North Carolina early in their history became convinced that it was impossible to succeed in their work and hold together without a religious journal. In the year 1833 at the request of the Convention Thomas Meredith started "The Interpreter" which was two years later changed to **The Biblical Recorder**. Today **The Recorder** has reached an all time high. By 1964 it is hoped the circulation will reach 100,000.

Through the years Baptist people have looked upon **The Recorder** as a "Brave True Herald", going before Baptist hosts, never wavering, nor ever giving an uncertain sound . . . as an able defender of the faith. It keeps Baptists informed, aids in the development of our churches, and brings untold blessings to our homes.

The Recorder should be in every Baptist Home.

THE CHILDREN'S HOMES

Our orphanages, known today as The Childrens' Homes, have always been close to the hearts of North Carolina Baptists. It is one of our oldest ministries, and down through the years thousands of boys and girls have been blessed and prepared for Christian Service and citizenship through these institutions. In the words of Superintendent W. R. Waggoner "848 boys and girls were served by the Childrens' Homes during the past year". What task is more important than helping a child, hurt by life, to grow into healthy, well adjusted, responsible citizenship? Each child who comes to the Childrens' Homes is different, with a different need to be met, and different problems to be solved. So much of the work is with children who for various reasons have lost the security of home and parents.

Financial support this year has come from the following sources:

THE HOSPITAL

In 1922 The Baptist State Convention established the Baptist Hospital at Winston Salem as a Missionary Enterprise. Baptist people with a desire to promote a total Christian Ministry reasoned that Christ gave much of His time to the healing of the sick, and furthermore He directly enjoined His followers to "Heal The Sick".

Each year the Hospital continues to extend its ministry. The 80 bed Progressive care center, with each room named after an Association, is open and rendering a wonderful service.

The Hospital operates the largest Diploma School of Nursing in North Carolina, and it teaches and trains hundreds of young people in highly specialized fields such as Nurses, Doctors, Technicians, Chaplains, and Pastor-Counselors.

The ministry is three fold: Teaching, Preaching, Healing.

Though the Hospital shares in Cooperative Program receipts, each year on Mother's Day churches make special offerings to be used primarily in providing service for those unable to pay. The churches in the Sandhills have increased these special offerings from year to year.

THE HOMES FOR THE AGED

The youngest ministry of North Carolina Baptists is that care being provided for the aging in our denomination. Though only initiated about 12 years ago, already Baptists have reached out in this service till today we have four (4) Homes The Hamilton Home in the eastern part of the state has just opened its doors; the others are: Headquarters, Resthaven, Albemarle.

Support for these Homes for the Aging comes from three sources: The Cooperative Program, Receipts from Special February Love Offering, and designated gifts.

New residents are being received as fast as space is available. More than 80 are now on the waiting list.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday School plays a vital part in winning the lost to Christ. We call it The Teaching Arm of The Church, yet through this teaching there is direct witnessing and winning. In the Sandhills Association every church has a Sunday School and these play a great part in the life of the Churches.

The Vacation Bible School effort is a phase of the teaching program, and each year interest in our Association grows in the promotion of these

schools for Bible teaching.

We try to have stated times for the Officers and Teachers from the different schools to gather for fellowship and instruction in Better Bible Teaching. Mr. Brady Brooks has been the Associational Superintendent for two years. His help and leadership has meant much to all of us. We hate to lose him from our Association.

THE BROTHERHOOD

The Brotherhood seeks to enlist, inform, and involve Baptist men and boys in every area of the Church's ministry. This general objective is realized through four (4) particular areas: Royal Ambassadors, Christian Witnessing, Personal Stewardship, and World Missions. Programs and activities in these four areas are designed in such a way as to equip men and boys with the knowledge of church programs and ministries. It has been a good year for the Brotherhood in our Association. Under the splendid leadership of Mr. Joe Lennon we have held several retreats for special study and planning. In these we have had the help of Mr. Gary Harthcock of the Baptist State Convention.

THE TRAINING UNION

The late Dr. J. E. Lambdin said that the Training Union seeks to:

1. Help produce strong church members who will live the whole teaching of Christ.
2. Help build strong churches which will engage in the whole program of Christ.
3. Help develop a strong denomination which will carry out the Great Commission.

We believe this organization, this arm of the church, bears a major share of responsibility in the conservation of those we win to Christ. Through its program of study and activities, The Training Union provides knowledge and practical expressions of learned truths, and makes possible "individual development through individual participation".

Every church should have a Training Union.

14. W. E. Kivette, Moderator, called the Association to order at 10:00 A.M. Paul West led the congregation in singing "Draw Me Nearer" with Mrs. Sam Hartsell at the piano. Rev. Amos Garner, pastor of Flint Hill Church led the devotion by reading Scripture and then offered prayer.

15. R. D. Spear, Jr., Chairman of the committee on order of business announced that since the Biblical Recorder Representative had not arrived the order would be shifted and he presented J. Ned Beatty of Fayetteville who spoke on "Sharing Christ Man to Man."

16. The moderator recognized our missionary Lee Pridgen who presented Cyrus Bazemore, associate to the Editor of the Biblical Recorder. He spoke on Christian literature.

17. Congregational hymn was led by Paul West.

18. E. C. Wilkie, General Missionary for the Baptist State Convention was recognized and brought an inspiring message on State Missions.

19. Miscellaneous announcements were made.

a. Lee Pridgen announced the funeral service of Rev. M. D. Chrisco pastor of Calvary would be held at Union Grove Baptist Church, Sat. afternoon, October 20, at 2:30 P.M.

b. Announcement of Committee meetings to meet at the noon hour.

c. Donald Bratton, host pastor, announced the arrangements for the noon meal.

20. Paul West led the congregation in singing two stanzas of a hymn.

21. W. K. Metters, pastor of Red Branch Church, delivered the annual sermon. W. Glenn Snider read the Scripture and offered prayer. Sermon Text was "Sharing Christ through New Testament Stewardship".

22. Hymn, "Draw Me Nearer".

23. Donald Bratton pronounced the Benediction and offered Thanks for the noon meal.

AFTERNOON SESSION

24. The Moderator, W. E. Kivette, called the association to order and Paul West, Jr., led the congregation in singing.

25. E. L. Christy, pastor at Robbins read the Scripture and offered prayer.

26. The regular order Teaching and Training was passed over by the Moderator as the speaker had not arrived.

27. William Poole, Superintendent of the Home For the Aged spoke in behalf of that institution.

28. The Baptist Hospital was discussed by P. L. Mierburg.

29. I. G. Grier was presented and made an inspirational talk in behalf of the Children's Homes.

30. J. D. Ives presented the Historian's Report. It was adopted.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The following Ministers are new to the Sandhills Baptist Association: — Rev. Donald Bratton, Pastor to Fairview and Taylor Memorial Baptist Churches; Rev. E. L. Christy, Pastor of the Robbins Baptist Church; Rev. W. C. Medlin, Pastor of the Cameron Baptist Church; Rev. Charles Moseley, Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Carthage and Rev. R. T. Willis, Pastor of the Lemon Springs and Ephesus Baptist Churches.

The Executive Committee of the Association on Oct. 30, 1961 met at the Red Branch Baptist Church, on Jan. 29, 1962 at the Taylor Memorial Baptist Church, on March 26, at the New Home Baptist Church, on June 25, at the Unity Grove Baptist Church and on Sept. 24, at the Piney Wood Baptist Church.

"M Night" for the Training Union was held on Dec. 4, 1961 at the First Baptist Church of Southern Pines.

A Conference on Evangelism was held at the Carthage Baptist Church on Feb. 8, 1962. Julian S. Hopkins and Gary Harthcock, from the Division of Evangelism of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, were the principal speakers.

The Sandhills Baptist Youth Fellowship organization met on Feb. 8, 1962 at the First Baptist Church of Carthage.

A Vacation Bible School Clinic as held at the First Baptist Church of Carthage on April 30, 1962.

April 8 - 13, 1962 was the Associational Missions Week of Prayer.

The Brotherhood and Laymen's Night was held on May 28, 1962 at the First Baptist Church of Southern Pines.

A Personal Evangelism Retreat was held at Jack Taylor's Cottage by

the Aberdeen Lake on July 21, 1962.

The First Baptist Church of Aberdeen began this year by initiating the Forward Program of Stewardship Education. In addition, a Mission Sunday School was begun at the Children's Building at McCain Sanatorium; prayer meetings for men and women were started at the McCain Prison, and an annual three-night Deacon School was originated. Regular programs for Vacation Bible School, Laymen's Retreat, Youth Beach Retreat and Youth Week were begun. This missionary program helped to make 1961-1962 a fine year for the Church in the Lord's work.

The Bethlehem Baptist Church has finished and have occupied a \$15000.00 Educational Building.

The Calvary Baptist Church continues to grow. Rev. M. D. Chriscoe has been called to be their new Pastor. New song books have been purchased. The Sunday School rooms have been painted, rugs laid and heating facilities installed. Also a yard light has been erected during this past year.

The Cameron Baptist Church has had their Church Building painted both on the exterior and the interior. Also bulletin boards have been purchased for each Sunday School classroom.

The Fairview Baptist Church has completed the columns for the entrance porch. The Auditorium has been ceiled, painted and lights installed also a new two-unit heating plant has been installed. Two rest rooms have been completed to the extent that they are usable which includes a septic tank and a sewer line. The Church has purchased a new electric pump and except for painting, four more Sunday School rooms and a Fellowship Hall have been completed and a Brotherhood organized. Rev. Donald Bratton has been called to be their new Pastor along with Taylor Memorial Baptist Church.

The Flint Hill Baptist Church has added an electric heater to their upstairs Sunday School Room and two window fans and two floor mats for their Sanctuary at the cost of \$126.59. For their Fellowship Hall a sink and a hot water heater have been added, also they have had their tables inlaid at a total cost for labor and material of \$627.67.

The Ives Memorial Baptist Church voted to have a full time Pastor. Rev. E. Paul West was called to serve full time at the Ashley Heights Baptist Church and he preached his last sermon, as Pastor, at Ives Memorial on Aug. 26, 1962. The Church called Rev. Richard Hopkins of McCain Sanatorium to fill the pulpit during September and perhaps longer while the pulpit committee is seeking a full time Minister, and the Church has purchased a building to be used as a Pastorium. The Sunday School Vacation Bible School this year advanced from a 5-day to an 8-day School. The W.M.U. Circle No. 1 gave 5 hymnal racks and 34 cup racks and Circle No. 2 gave to the Church a set of service cups and a metal serving tray for the Lord's Supper.

During the past year New Home Baptist Church added four new Sun-

day School Rooms and covered the seats of the Auditorium.

The Pleasant Hill Baptist Church has built four new Sunday School Rooms, during the past year, and they are being used although a few finishing touches still have to be made to them.

The Red Branch Baptist Church has bought land for a Parsonage and hope to begin work on it soon. And recently the Church has bought a carpet sweeper.

The First Baptist Church of Southern Pines has bought a new tone cabinet for the organ at a cost of \$541.00 and a new addressograph for the office at a cost of \$250.00. The exterior of the Sanctuary, Educational Building and also the garage at the Pastorium have been painted and trimmed at a cost of \$1200.00. The old plumbing in the Pastorium has been replaced by copper pipes at a cost of \$400.00. Also three fire extinguishers have been added to their equipment.

In October, 1961, the West End Baptist Church adopted the rotating system of Deacons. Mr. John M. McCracken was made an Honorary Deacon for life, in recognition of his long and faithful service to the Church. In May, 1962, plans were adopted, and the foundation was laid for a recreation building. This will include kitchen, bathroom and dining area.

The past few years have been ones of steady growth in the Association, and much of the credit is due to Missionary Lee Pridgen. During this past year when the Taylor Memorial Baptist Church was without a Pastor, Missionary Lee Pridgen acted as a supply Pastor until Rev. Donald Bratton was called to be their Pastor jointly with that of Fairview Church.

At the beginning of this past Associational year Missionary Lee Pridgen inaugurated what he called "Associational Night" to occur on the last Monday night of each month and as far as practical Associational meetings were planned for that night. "M Night", all five meetings of the Executive Committee, the Vacation Bible School Clinic and the Brotherhood and Layman's Night were held on an Associational Night.

During this past year the Sandhills Youth Fellowship organization began to function. The Vacation Bible School enrollment has increased from 1392 in 1958 to 1966 in 1961. The total Church enrollment has increased from 4535 in 1958 to 4925 in 1961. The total Training Union enrollment has increased from 643 in 1958 to 1047 in 1961. The total Brotherhood membership has increased from 137 in 1958 to 264 in 1961. Only the Sunday School shows a slight decrease in total membership from 4585 in 1958 to 4402 in 1961.

Missionary Lee Pridgen has urged that each Church in the Association reach out beyond their own immediate vicinity and that the laymen be encouraged to be more active in carrying on the Lord's work and that this Association may truly be ever forward marching in carrying out the great commission.

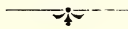

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CONSTITUTION and BY-LAWS

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Sandhills Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of co-operating Missionary Baptist Churches within the area served by the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to the Committee on Reception of Churches, which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith and practice. Upon a vote of the Association, the church shall be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

The application of an established Missionary Baptist Church, co-operative member of an adjacent Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, shall upon recommendation of that Association, upon favorable recommendation of our Committee on Reception of Churches, and upon favorable vote of this Association, be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

Churches making application for membership into this Association between annual meetings may be voted on and admitted to full membership by a majority vote of the Executive Committee after investigation, approval and recommendation of the Committee on Reception of Churches.

Section 3 The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

Section 4. Any church may withdraw from this Association at its pleasure.

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) the members of all standing committees of the Association. The aforesaid officers, pastors and standing committee members shall constitute ex-officio messengers at large of the Association and exercise all rights and privileges of duly elected messengers. (4) Three messengers from each cooperating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each fifty members or major fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to elect more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger or messenger at large who is not a member of a church which is a

cooperating member of the Association. Messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A cooperating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

B. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the officers, pastors, members of standing committees, as messengers at large of the Association, and the duly elected messengers or their alternates present.

Section 3. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power to infringe on any of the internal rights of the individual churches. It may advise with the member churches and recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance and may claim for its objects and programs the highest consideration.

ARTICLE V. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers. The Officers of the Association shall be moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian and three Trustees. The officers shall be elected at the annual meetings and installed during the afternoon session of the second day. They shall assume their duties immediately after installation and continue in office until their successors are installed. The moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one year terms in succession.

Section 2. Departments. The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Baptist Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, and the Department of Church Music. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary to the Association. The Department heads shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Committees. There shall be the following standing committees (1) Committee on Committees; (2) Committee on Constitution and By-Laws; (3) Executive Committee; (4) Nominating Committee; (5) Committee on Ordinations; (6) Committee on Place and Preacher; (7) Program Committee; (8) Promotion Committee; (9) Committee on Reception of Churches; (10) Committee on Resolutions.

Section 4. Employees. The Missionary and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole Program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction and be subject to the authority of the Executive Committee. They shall be nominated by the promotion Committee and elected by the Executive Committee or the Association, in Annual Session.

ARTICLE IV. REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two thirds of the messengers present provided that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following By-Laws.

BY-LAWS**ARTICLE I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1. The **Moderator** shall preside over the sessions of the Association and see that order and decorum are observed by everyone present. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

Section 2. The **Vice Moderator** shall preside at the pleasure of the moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator.

Section 3 It shall be the duty of the **Clerk-Treasurer**

(1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.

(3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.

(4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association. Disbursement shall be made in accordance with the budget adopted by the Association. Non-budgeted items must be approved by the Executive Committee.

(5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the **Historian** to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member Churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

Section 5. The **Trustees** shall hold title to all property of the Association. When authorized by the Executive Committee of the Association, they shall execute notes secured by mortgages and deeds of trust in the purchase of church sites or other property. The Trustees in all acts with respects to property purchased shall be controlled and directed by the Association through its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. The **Committee on Committees**, consisting of five members, shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee on Committees shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 2. The **Committee on Constitution and By-Laws**, consisting of four members shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator,

Missionary, and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This Committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws as may be necessary to better serve the purposes of the Association.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall be composed of (1) the active pastors of member churches; (2) the officers of the Association; (3) the chairman of each standing committee of the Association as ex-officio members at large representing the Association on this committee; and (4) two members elected by each church. This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall hold quarterly meetings at times and places determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the event that regular members cannot attend Executive Committee meetings.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee, consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations for each office of the Association to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. The Committee on Ordination, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all Pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations, as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 6. The Committee to Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of meeting and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 7. The Program Committee, which shall consist of three members shall plan well in advance the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 8. The Promotion Committee shall consist of nine members with the Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer serving as ex-officio members. The other six members to include a designated Chairman of the committee shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association. It shall be the duty of this committee, co-opera-

ting with the Missionary, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action, implementing promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association. It shall receive and disburse all Mission Club Funds. This committee shall at the Executive Committee Meetings, bring regular reports regarding receipts, disbursements, progress made, and future plans for our Associational Missions Program.

Section 9. The Committee on Reception of Churches, composed of three members, shall receive all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrines, practices, and co-operation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement of its findings along with its recommendations shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Executive Committee as provided herein in Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution.

Section 10. The Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE III. PROCEDURE

All business shall be conducted and all discussions shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

FOURTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION

of the

SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

WEST END BAPTIST CHURCH, WEST END, N. C.

THURSDAY NIGHT, OCT. 17, 1963

1. The Sandhills Baptist Association was called to order for its 14th Annual Session at 7 P.M., October 17th, 1963 by W. E. Kivette, Moderator. The opening period of worship was led by Rev. MISSIONARY REPORT

Introduction

When the Christian sincerely seeks to know the will of His Master concerning areas scheduled for Missionary conquest he could consider the last words of Christ as recorded in Acts 1:8:

“But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you, and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth.”

In these last words of Christ the Christian has His marching orders. They set forth the total area of responsibility for those who call themselves Christian. Please note that the same Commission that directs the Christian to witness at home, also directs him to witness through Missionary endeavors in other fields. We are to witness ‘BOTH’ at home — AND Abroad. It is

to be a simultaneous effort or enterprise.

It is BOTH . . . In Jerusalem — and — Judea — and — Samaria — and the Uttermost parts of the world.

Here we have clearly outlined: 1. Community Missions, 2. Associational Missions, 3. State Missions, 4. Home Missions, 5. Foreign Missions. All this is to be carried forward simultaneously. This is World Missions.

Associational Missions

For five years now we have been carrying forward a Missionary Program within our Association. In no Association is there found today a better fellowship than ours. As your Missionary we have tried to lead step by step with prayer and patient planning. We began from the beginning with the desire to see the Sandhills grow into a great Association . . . of fellowship, purpose, and missionary service. The Kingdom of God must be **ADVANCED FROM JERUSALEM AND JUDEA**. This means the strengthening of the home base that the supply line may be sustained. The story of Associational Missions is always the same:

When missionary compassion is aflame in the local churches and association there is a great spiritual conquest in areas beyond. The building of greater Missionary fires in the Sandhills Association will result in Spiritual warmth felt in far away places.

State Missions

Baptists in North Carolina now number close to 1 million. These are in about 4000 churches. The work of State Missions is ever increasing as new areas or spheres of service are added. There is the ministry to the deaf, to the many institutions, to the negroes, the Indians, et cetera. Supplementary aid is given to the Associations in their Missionary Program, and to weak churches, enabling them to support a pastor. The support for our State Missions work comes through receipts from the Cooperative Program, and the special offering taken once each year.

Home Missions

The report of The Home Mission Board reveals that we have 2078 missionaries serving in the United States, Cuba, Panama, and the Canal Zone. In addition there were 595 students serving during the summer under the Board's direction. The Annie Armstrong Offering, which amounts to about half the Board's income, rose to nearly 3 million dollars last year.

Foreign Missions

When we consider the world-wide Christian enterprise through the Foreign Missions Board it is gratifying to observe that the organized churches and chapels as of last year totaled 10633, and that the membership reached nearly 500,000 with 35,509 Baptisms. It should be kept in mind that the number of Baptisms does not indicate the large number of people who have made some manifestation of deep concern for the Gospel of Christ. Many have made professions of faith and are in the process of instruction for Church membership. No one can calculate the far reaching influence of the

Gospel of Christ in the hearts of many people who have been touched by it.

Last year there were 1627 Missionaries, and 12 Missionary Associates working in the many nations being served by the Foreign Missions Board. In the Foreign Mission Enterprise Southern Baptists put more than 20 Million dollars last year.

The Cooperative Program

The Cooperative Program helps us to see a total world Missions Program. Through this means our churches are able to present a united front and develop a unified approach. Since 1925 the Cooperative Program has been the channel enabling North Carolina Baptists to support the world ministry committed to them by Christ in the Great Commission. With gifts through the Cooperative Program the individual Baptist and the individual church shares in the denomination's program of witnessing, teaching, healing, and preaching at home and to the ends of the earth.

The Cooperative Program is the love of God in action, the hands of God at work.

Contributions from the churches through the Cooperative Program for all causes are sent to the Convention office in Raleigh. Southern Baptist Convention causes share the southwide part of the Cooperative Program dollar in accordance with the wishes of the Messengers from the churches to the Annual Meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention. North Carolina Baptist Convention causes share in the Cooperative Program dollar in accordance with the decision of the messengers at the Annual State Convention. At the present the division is 66% for State Causes, and 34% for Southwide causes.

14. Max A. Gilmore, Pastor of Beulah Hill Baptist Church, made a few remarks of their appreciation of coming into the Sandhills Baptist Association and asked that the committee on Place and Preacher accept an invitation for the Association to meet at Beulah Hill on Friday of the Annual Session in 1964.

15. Hymn by the Congregation.

16. Lee Pridgen, Missionary, spoke about the Simultaneous Revival Crusade, and recommended the following, and moved its adoption. Motion adopted.

ANNUAL WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION SANDHILLS ASSOCIATION 1963

The Women of the Sandhills Associational WMU organizations have this year worked and studied for the advancement of our mission program on its 75th anniversary. We are indeed better founded in missions for our Lord because of our forerunners in missions. Now we must look forward to our year of Baptist Jubilee advance for Christ through missions. Our WMU Watchword for 1963-1964 is "O give thanks unto the Lord; call upon his name: make known his deeds among the people." Psalm 105:1

As missionaries and churches in our association we are proud to serve for Christ for we are not our own but God's to carry the soul-saving message to the lost on the home fields, and the foreign fields. The world is truly the field and Jesus said "Go ye into all the world, and preach the came to her "Who knoweth whether thou art come to the Kingdom for such a time as this." Today we might ask ourselves this same question. Gospel to every creature, baptizing them in the name of the father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things

whatsoever I have commanded you; and, lo I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." We have and we experience the love of Christ through the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit but we as his chosen missionaries must carry His message to a lost world. He promises to always be with us and give us power.

Does our report show that we as an associaton of missionaries have enough faith to use God's, talents, give God's offerings, to share God's message to a lost world? We have more work to do!

There are 26 churches but only 20 WMU, 2 less than last year. We need encouragement and support of these six pastors of these churches. There are this year a total of 889 members; 451, WMS; 27, YWA; 167, GA; and 255, Sunbeam Band. A loss of 96 members this year. only 4 of the 20 churches. We have gained on SB in one church. We lost two YWA and gained two YWA. We do not have but about one-half of

We have GA and SB organizations in 12 of 20 churches. We have YWA in our resident women church members as members in our WMS. Most of our churches gave 15% more for our Foreign, State and Home Missions, during Weeks of Prayer. 4 churches are advanced societies.

What is our WMU Association's greatest needs?

1. We need to study God's word. "Thy word is a light unto my path . . ." Develop our spiritual life through Daily Bible Reading, use of Calendar of Prayer, maintain family worship and observe Weeks of Prayer and pray without ceasing.

2. We need to understand God's World — Jesus said, "I am the light of the world; he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life" John 8:12

With race prejudices, greed and selfishness in the world is there a light or dark world today? We need a deep appreciation for all people and a great concern for those without Christ.

3. We need to do God's work. Paul said to the church of Corinth — "My beloved brothers, stand firm and immovable and work for the Lord always, work without limit; since you know that in the Lord your labor cannot be lost" I Cor. 15:58. We must strengthen our Christian standards in our personal life, in our homes and communities. Make efforts to have a Christlike concern for those who are lost.

4. We need to support God's work — Seek to be examples in Christian sharing through tithing, giving to world missions through the Cooperative program. How can we expect God to bless us when we put so little in our budgets for missions? To save the lost in our world is our mission.

5. We need to bring others into God's Work. Get all women in our church mission societies. Cultivate missionary desires in our youth. Go out and find those not a member and not a Christian but a child of God's to be saved. An angel said to Mary Magdalene on that first Easter morning — "Come — See!" and then "Go quickly and tell."

Among the important women of the Bible there is Esther. The question

came to her "Who knoweth whether thou art come to the Kingdom for such a time as this." Today we might ask ourselves this same question. We with all our potentials, our prayers, our gifts, our time, our service are needed for such a time as this. This day for you and me is our one and only opportunity to serve God and man. If we do not serve well in our day, we have no other charge to be a blessing to others through our missions.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

A Sunday School Officers' and Teachers' Clinic was held Oct. 29, 1962 at the Carthage Baptist Church.

Training Union "M" Night was held on Nov. 26, 1962 at the Carthage Baptist Church .

A Vacation Bible School Conference was held at the Carthage Baptist Church on Tuesday, April 23, 1963.

The Promotion Committee of the Sandhills Baptist Association met at the Carthage Baptist Church on April 24, 1963, and at the Southern Pines Baptist Church on Sept. 10, 1963, with Chairman T. O. Moses presiding.

The Executive Committee of the Association met at the Bethlehem Baptist Church on Monday, Jan. 28, 1963, at the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church on April 29, at the Unity Grove Baptist Church on July 29 and at the Ephesus Baptist Church on Sept. 30, 1963.

A Brotherhood meeting and banquet was held at the Beulah Hill Baptist Church on May 27, 1963.

The "News Bulletin" edited by Missionary Lee Pridgen during the past year has two helpful features added namely the Associational Calendar for the year and a map showing the location of each Church in the Association.

The First Baptist Church of Aberdeen is just now without a pastor, Rev. R. D. Spear having resigned on Sept. 12, 1963. The pulpit committee is operating and the Church Services are going along on regular schedule with supply Ministers. The Church has a parsonage and a history of the Church is under consideration. The parking lot has been paved, a retainer wall has been built and all the rest rooms have been completed with a total cost

of \$4290.59.

The Ashley Heights Baptist Church has gone full time and their new pastor, H. L. Summerford, lives in the Parsonage on the field.

The Cameron Baptist Church has organized a new Adult Sunday School Class, purchased choir robes and a piano. The Church has a parsonage and the Pastor lives on the field. A history of the Church has been written as given on page 20 of the 1954 minutes of the Association.

In January 1963 Rev. James T. Moon was called to be Pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church, Rev. M. D. Chrisco having passed on to his heavenly reward. A water pump has been installed and now water runs to the church. The church grounds have also been improved.

The Ephesus Baptist Church has had the outside of the church and windows painted. The Church has secured a gas heater for one of the Sunday School rooms, and two of the Sunday School rooms were painted by class members, and curtains have been made for three Sunday School rooms. The church grounds have also been improved.

The Fairview Baptist Church spent about \$1400.00 in finishing the Sunday School rooms, about \$800.00 was spent for finishing the baptistry which includes a picture and a fiberglass pool. And at a cost of \$179.00 gutters were added to the church. A new Sunday School room has been added and shrubbery has been planted around the church also the cemetery lot has been cleaned up. On Pages 31 - 33 of the Minutes of the Association for 1959-1960 a history of the Church is given. The pastor lives on the field.

The Flint Hill Baptist Church has bought a secretary's desk for the Church, and considerable work has been done on the fellowship hall, this includes awnings, materials and labor, plumbing supplies and lumber. Also filters for the furnace have been bought making a total cost of \$333.85 for the improvements.

Rev. J. W. Singletary began his work as full time Pastor of the Ives Memorial Baptist Church this fall and he lives on the field in the parsonage in Pinebluff. The Church has a new concrete sidewalk and steps in front of the church which go to the street parking area in front of the church. A history of the Church has been written for the first fifty years of the church.

The Lemon Springs Baptist Church has had their church painted on the outside. A Brotherhood has been organized. A history of the Church was written about 1950 or 1951. Their pastor lives in Hamlet, N. C.

The New Home Baptist Church has painted their new Sunday School rooms both on the inside and outside, bought new song books, chairs and a pulpit light. The pastor lives on the field. A history of the Church was written when the Church was organized February 9, 1951.

A new roof has been put on the Pine Grove Baptist Church.

The Pleasant Hill Baptist Church has completed four Sunday School rooms and remodeled two old ones and now they have six Sunday School Classes instead of four. Approximately 2 acres of land, to be added to the cemetery, has been given to the Church by R. J. Snipes and W. O. Moss. A history of the Church was written April 23, 1954.

Rev. W. K. Metters who has been living on the field of the Red Branch Baptist Church has resigned and he expects to leave the field soon. As yet the Church has no parsonage but has already bough a lot for a parsonage, and has had a well drilled on the lot. The Church has bought song books for the Junior Choir and a G.A. has been organized. The following have been acquired during the past year namely: a riding lawn mower, a new electric pump, memorial plates for the pews, two new baby beds and mattresses for the nursery and a new carpet sweeper has been bought.

The First Baptist of Robbins is at present without a Pastor.

The Unity Grove Baptist Church has added new pews, a new heating system installed and the church grounds have been improved during this past year. On June 16, 1962 a history of the Church was written. At present the Church is without a Pastor.

The Vass Baptist Church has organized a Royal Ambassadors. The Pastor lives on the field and about two years ago a history of the Church was written.

The West End Baptist Church is at present without a Pastor since Rev. Clifton Tuttle resigned on June 1, 1963. A new "Youth Building" has been started, new tile has been laid in the kitchen of the parsonage and the church grounds have been improved.

Proceedings of the Fifteenth Annual Session of The Sandhills Baptist Association

VASS BAPTIST CHURCH, VASS, N. C.

THURSDAY NIGHT, OCT. 15, 1964

11. W. E. Kivett, Chairman of the Promotion Committee introduced our Missionary, Michael T. Ray. A report was made by Mr. Ray.

MISSIONARY REPORT

The new Missionary has been on the field since the first of September 1964. During this time your Missionary has visited the following churches: Aberdeen, Ashley Heights, Beulah Hill, Bethlehem, Calvary, Cameron, Carthage, Fairview, Highlands, Pleasant Hill, Red Branch, Southern Pines, Vass, West End and Unity Grove. He has conducted five Worship Services, three Prayer Services, spoken at two Brotherhood meetings, attended three Revival Services, assisted several Associational committees, participated in one ordination Service, and conducted two Vesper Services at the Morrison Training School, Hoffman, N. C., where they are 360 youth. At the close of the meeting on October 4, 1964, eighteen students remained to talk with the Missionary about spiritual problems. Conferences are being arranged by the Superintendent of Morrison Training School for your Missionary to have personal conferences with the students.

On September 19, 1964, your missionary and Rev. John Hales visited the Sandy Branch area to talk with members of the Sandy Branch Baptist Church about the closure of that church but we were unable to locate any members except one young high school girl who informed us that the church had been closed for more than a year and that many of the members were now attending other churches.

One Newsletter has been published in September 1964. The Promotion Committee voted that one Newsletter be published each quarter with a supplement issue whenever needed. It was also voted that the Newsletter should be sent not only to the Officers and Executive Committee members but to all active Deacons, church clerks, Sunday School Superintendents, Training Union Directors, and Women Missionary Union Presidents, from each church.

We request all church clerks to send the names of the above mentioned leaders of your church with their proper address to the Sandhills Baptist Association Office, P.O. Box 507, Carthage, N. C. as soon as possible.

It has been suggested that the new 1964-65 Associational Officers work with the Missionary in planning and printing a Calendar of Activities based on the 1965 calendar year. Included would be Asso-

ciational activities, North Carolina Baptist State Convention and Southern Baptist Convention activities, of which we feel a part of. (One calendar will be sent to each family . . . not separate member . . . in each participating church, therefore we are requesting the church clerk of each church to send along with the other information requested the number of calendars your church will need.)

One of the major responsibilities of our pastors is the visiting the sick, ministering to the grieved and comforting those in sorrow. I believe many of our church members are vitally interested in having their pastor as well trained in this ministry as in preaching and teaching the gospel. North Carolina Baptists are fortunate in having in our state an institution such as the N.C. Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem, N. C. where we may send the sick, but we are also fortunate in having in the N.C. Baptist Hospital the Pastoral Care and Clinical Training School where our pastors may receive training in the ministry of the sick and sorrowing. I trust the churches of our association will send their pastors for the six week training courses as I know it will be most helpful to the church members as well as to the pastors. The weekly sessions are from Monday, 11 a.m. to Friday, 2 p.m. thus giving time to the pastor to be on his church field from Friday to Monday morning. To those churches sending their pastor for this training I am offering to conduct your Mid-Week Prayer Services and visit patients in the Moore Memorial Hospital during the pastor's absence if you so desire. If you are interested please write your missionary.

Your Missionary appreciates the cooperation received from each of you and trust that as we face the new year we may continue to work and labor together for the Glory of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

The Associational Office, located in the Baptist Church, Carthage is open every morning and all pastors, leaders and members of our Association are invited to come by for a visit. Afternoons will usually be devoted to visiting different sections of the Association or in conferences scheduled at the Office. In case you would like for your Missionary to visit your church, meet with any of your committees, or be of help in other ways I trust you will write or call. SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

There are 28 churches in the Sandhills Baptist Association with a total enrollment of 4085, with the average attendance of 2533. The total enrollment in the Vacation Bible Schools was 1702.

The main objective last year in the Sunday School was the "Out-reach for the Unreached" by personal visitation and witness. The main objective for 1964-65 is the "Adult Thrust," in which the churches

are to locate, win, enlist, challenge, and use Adults in our Sunday Schools and church work. Many churches are marking time because they need more full-time witnesses, better teachers, and more stable families. These await the reaching of more adults. The goal of the Sunday School is to have 10 million Adults enrolled in our Sunday Schools by 1970. Will you have a part in helping us reach that goal?

22. Michael T. Ray announced that a service of dedication would be held Sunday, October 18, 1964 at Colonial Heights Baptist Church in Aberdeen.

23. Tilden Cheek, Associational Brotherhood President, made a report and moved that the report be adopted as read.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

The Sandhills Association has a total of 28 churches, of which only nine have a Brotherhood. I would like to see every church in our association have a Brotherhood and know of no better time to begin than the beginning of the new church year.

The opportunities are greater and the need is greater than ever before.

REPORT ON BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES

Helping children and young people to grow and develop toward Christian maturity is of the greatest privileges in life. It is the purpose of the Children's Homes to develop the highest quality of men and women possible out of boys and girls who are served. Careful attention is given to their needs, both present and future.

Children are accepted as they are when they come to the Homes. In the spirit of Christ, they are recognized for their sacred worth and value. They are provided food, clothing and shelter. But of greater importance than material things is the genuine interest, concern and love given every child by the Christian men and women who work with them. Many children who have known only heartbreak and tragedy learn to love again—learn to trust in themselves, in adults and in God.

26. The moderator recognized W. W. Olive, Homes for the Aged Representative, who introduced Mr. Joe Leonard who spoke on the activity of the Homes for the Aged.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

Our Baptist Homes have just completed their 13th year of opera-

tion and are entering into the 14th year with eager anticipation and with much enthusiasm. God has blessed these brief years with an abundance of His love and with the good things of life. Growth has been rapid, the development of facilities amazing, and the need for additional space staggering. We have come from one resident and one building, since March of 1951, to 160 residents and 4 buildings in 1964. Today there are 170 people waiting for admission. There are hundreds of inquiries during any given year from aging persons who are sick, for whom we cannot care because of lack of bed patient space. We must give an answer to these good people and begin now making plans for a nursing facility that will be large enough to receive some of these who are sick, or invalids, at admission.

The choicest bit of news for 1964 is the development of a 5th Baptist Home, to be located at Yanceyville, North Carolina. We are hoping to begin construction on this new project during this year, and thus, the burden of our hearts will have been relieved, in a measure, by being able to care for 30 additional residents. The Home at Yanceyville is the greatest single bequest that has ever been left for us in our ministry. Enough land at Yanceyville and money were given to the Baptist Foundation of North Carolina for us, by the late R. Sterling Graves and his sister Mrs. Sallie Willie Graves Bradsher, to build and equip the Home there. Even so, we will still need to look to our Baptist people for the maintenance of this Home and for assistance in supplementing needy residents who will live there through the years.

Today, North Carolina Baptists are contributing an average of \$90.00 a month on the cost of care of 90% of the residents who live in our four Baptist Homes at Resthaven and the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem, at the Albemarle Home and Hamilton Home. This support comes through the Special Day Offerings, received in the churches on the third Sunday of February each year, through designated gifts from church budgets, and through the Homes' share in the Cooperative Program. These needy residents could not possibly be with us, nor could they receive the loving care that they do, if it were not for the gifts from our 3400 Baptist churches. Earnest heed should be given by each church, therefore, towards increasing the amount of Special Day Offerings and designated gifts to the Homes.

Life among the residents these days is most interesting and filled with a variety of experiences. The youngest resident celebrated her 66th birthday in January, and the oldest her 103 birthday in July. Some are doing creative writing, others sewing, gardening, teaching, painting, and living a good life in general. All are praying for a world and its needs. All are expressing thanksgiving to God for the people called, "Baptists," and for the happiness and security of the Homes that our Baptist people are helping to make possible for them.

There is nothing to prevent our receiving any needy aging person, 65 years old and above, who is reasonably well, mentally and physically, except lack of space. Let us join our hearts in prayer and our lives in dedication that we may give a good account of our stew-

ardship in this great area of human concern and give an answer to as many of these dear people as possible.

MUSIC REPORT

"Come before His presence with singing" (Psalm 100:2). Christians have long followed this counsel as they have gathered for worship. It is significant that one of the best loved book of the Bible today is The Book of Psalms, the hymnbook of the Hebrew faith. In the singing of hymns we give expression to the faith which we believe in our hearts and practice in our lives.

In the scriptures we find high and worthy motives for singing set forth. Contrary to much of our opinion the highest motive for singing is not for our personal enjoyment. Worthy motives for singing include the following: To express Thanksgiving (Psalm 147:7); To express joy, gladness, and hope (Hosea 2:15; Psalm 67:4); To acknowledge God's majesty and power (Isaiah 24:14); To extol God's righteousness (Psalm 145:7); To declare God's mercy, judgment, and power (Psalm 59:16; 101:1); To praise God (Psalm 150:1,6); To bless God's name (Psalm 96:2); and to testify of God's wondrous works (Psalm 105:2).

These motiress can be used to judge our singing and to evaluate the worthiness of the hymns we sing. During the past year a beginning was made in seeking to provide guidance to our churches in the selecting and singing of worthy hymns. Mr. Joseph Stroud, secretary of the Church Music Department of The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, led a one night music workshop for this association last May. In addition to this activity a Christmas carol sing was led in conjunction with the "M" night program.

We need to work more diligently to lead the Lord's people in His churches to sing worthy hymns with meaning.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The Promotion Committee of the Sandhills Baptist Association met on Jan. 19, 1964 at the Highland Baptist Church, on Feb. 9, at the Carthage Baptist Church, on April 26, at the Southern Pines Baptist Church on July 26, at the Carthage Baptist Church and on Sept. 28, at the Aberdeen Baptist Church.

The Annual Vacation Bible School Conference of the Association was held on Tuesday, April 21, 1964 at the Carthage Baptist Church.

The Executive Committee of the Association met on Monday night,

Jan. 27, 1964 at the Calvary Baptist Church, on April 27 at the Ashley Heights Baptist Church, on July 27 at the Piney Wood Baptist Church on August 10 at the Carthage Baptist Church and on Sept. 28 at the Aberdeen Baptist Church.

"M Night" was held on Dec. 2, 1963 at the Carthage Baptist Church.

The Associational "Hymn Sing" met Monday night, May 11, 1964 at the Beulah Hill Baptist Church.

The Conference on Church Finance, on June 29-30, 1964 met at the Carthage Baptist Church.

The final Associational Night, with Rev. Lee Pridgen as the Associational Missionary, was held in the Aberdeen Baptist Church on August 31, 1964. Rev. Lee Pridgen reviewed the work he had done and accomplished during his time of service. He also gave suggestions and a challenge to the Association and to Rev. Michael T. Ray, the new Associational Missionary. The Association appreciates the splendid work for the advancement of Christ's kingdom which was done under the leadership of Rev. Lee Pridgen and a love offering was taken for him as a slight token of their appreciation. Michael T. Ray, the new Missionary, was installed along with the other incoming officers of the Association.

Rev. Gwen E. McCormick is the new Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Aberdeen, North Carolina.

During the past Associational year the Church has air-conditioned both their sanctuary and the third floor of their educational building. They have remodeled their Sunday School rooms on the third floor of the educational building and have installed carpets in the parsonage.

This past year a goodly number of young people have made their decisions for Christ. The revivals held by the Church have caused a spiritual growth within their membership yet the Church is aware that there is still much to be accomplished.

In January 1964 Rev. Fred Richardson was called to be Pastor of Calvary Baptist Church. The Calvary Baptist Church has had rest rooms put in their church building during this past year.

The Cameron Baptist Church has installed a fiberglass lining to their baptistry and has added a steeple to their church building which makes the sanctuary more attractive to their own membership and adds beauty for any passing by.

Two former members, Mrs. Pauline Hapling and Mr. Carl Rogers, have donated 50 folding chairs for the basement of the church.

The Longview Baptist Mission was organized in the American Legion Hut in Aberdeen on the first Sunday in September 1963. And on the last Sunday in September 1964 the Longview Mission moved to New Colonial Heights Baptist Church.

The Pastor, Rev. R. T. Willis, of the Ephesus Baptist Church donated to the Church 25 Broadman Hymnals, with the name of the Church printed on them. Also a special loose-leaf hymnal was given to the Pianist.

On the 3rd Sunday in May 1964 the Church held a special "Fellowship Service" honoring their members and friends who were over 65 years old. Their special pews were marked with bows of white ribbon and a special arrangement of flowers at the altar in their honor. After the service a picnic dinner was spread for the very joyous occasion. Their faithful member, Mr. P. A. Fisher, who celebrates his 100th birthday on Oct. 17, 1964, was also with them.

The Fairview Baptist Church has painted, covered with tile and purchased chairs for their fellowship hall. The rest rooms have been painted and the floors covered with tile. Two openings between the auditorium and the Sunday School rooms have been closed with folding partitions. Some work has been done on the cemetery grounds.

The Flint Hill Baptist Church has built stalls for the men's and women's bathrooms at an estimated cost of \$150.00.

The Highland Baptist Church had its first Vacation Bible School with an average attendance of about 50 each night.

A ceiling fan and an additional light have been installed in the choir area and a piano and 25 hymnals have been purchased.

The steeple of the church has been painted and a bell installed.

The wiring and water system of the Pastor's mobile home has been connected to that of the church and the Pastor is now living on the church property.

With the buying of a new piano for the sanctuary the Lemon Springs Baptist Church now has a piano in every department. The church has built an enclosed passage from the sanctuary to the educational building also an iron railing has been put on the front steps. Their "Home Coming" was held on July 26, 1964.

The members of the New Home Baptist Church finished painting and also completed all the work needed on their new Sunday School rooms.

The Piney Wood Baptist Church has installed a light in front of the church, cut trees in the cemetery and started building a bathroom inside the church building.

During the past year the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church has purchased a new piano for their auditorium at a cost of \$600, also pews for \$900 and fifty new hymnals for \$75. They have also made an addition to the pulpit for the choir at a cost of \$160. A nice Mason & Hamlin organ was given to the church by Miss Marie A. Williams. Their Pastor, Rev. Max A. Gilmore, now has preaching services every Sunday morning.

The Red Branch Baptist Church has built a beautiful pastorium and their new Pastor, Rev. John H. Steverson, moved into it this spring. The Church is now in the process of purchasing more land for their cemetery.

The Robbins Baptist Church moved into their new church building on the First Sunday in February 1964 and Rev. George T. Sturch preached his first sermon as their Pastor at that time.

On August 1, 1964 Rev. John Dawson Stone became the Minister of the First Baptist Church of Southern Pines. He was formerly Pas-

tor of the Trinity Baptist Church of Raleigh, N. C. Rev. Maynard Mangum, the former Pastor of the Southern Pines Baptist Church, having accepted the call to the First Baptist Church of Elizabeth City, N. C.

On Jan. 1, 1964 Rev. Darrell Cox became the Pastor of the West End Baptist Church. He lives with his family in the parsonage. Rev. Cox graduated from "Fruitland" in March 1964.

A new "Youth Building" is being built with kitchen and bathroom facilities. This building is expected to be completed this year.

The Beulah Hill Baptist Church, during the past year has completed extensive improvements in the basement Sunday School rooms. Concrete walks and entrance areas have been poured, the parking area enlarged and additional landscaping and outdoor lighting completed. Carpeting has been installed in the sanctuary, greatly enhancing the worship experience for members and visitors.

36. The Moderator, J. Chandler Eakes, called the Association to order and Donald Bratton led the congregation in singing BLESSED ASSURANCE, JESUS IS MINE.

37. Darold Cox, Pastor of West End Baptist Church, read the Scripture and offered prayer.

38. The moderator recognized J. Marse Grant, Editor of the Biblical Recorder, who spoke briefly.

39. A report on W.M.U. was given by Mrs. Lila Hopkins and then Mrs. Hopkins recognized Mrs. Louise Moseley and Mrs. Jack Taylor who presented a Skit on Local Missions.

40. Donald Bratton led the Congregational singing TO GOD BE THE GLORY.

41. The moderator, J. Chandler Eakes, recognized Mr. Gordon Maddry, who made a report on Baptist Foundation.

42. The Treasurer, Dewitt Purvis, made his annual report. It was adopted.

43. Charles Mosely, Chairman of Committee on Place and Preacher, made report as follows: Thursday night, October 14, 1965, Association will meet at Aberdeen Baptist Church, Friday, October 15, Association will meet at Bethlehem Baptist Church, Annual Sermon to be delivered by Rev. John Hales—alternate, Charles Moseley. Motion was made and seconded that this report be adopted.

44. John Hales, Chairman of Committee on Committees, presented report.

45. The moderator made a brief report of the work of the Association during the past year, and presented W. E. Kivett, Chairman of the Promotion Committee, who gave a report on the Executive Committee through the Promotion Committee has approved:

- (1) That we accept the resignation of Rev. Lee Pridgen
- (2) The adoption of the 1964-65 annual budget
- (3) The employment of Rev. Michael T. Ray as our Associational Missionary.
- (4) The statement of qualification and duties of the Associational Missionary with the exception of Section A, be incorporated in the minutes of the Association as a part of the report of the Executive Committee.

An Associational Missionary is . . .

1. Truly a minister. He comes "not to be ministered unto, but to minister," to work with—not simply or even primarily for—the pastors and church leaders in developing a worthy program in the churches and in the association.

2. A prophet—a dynamic leader who has an ear for God's message and an earnest desire to lend guidance in harmony therewith

to God's people in the association.

I. EXPERIENCE AND QUALIFICATIONS:

A. A call from God to do this work.

B. Not a novice, but one with experience enough to know the problems and heartbeat of the pastors and churches with whom he has to work.

C. Sufficient formal training and enough humility and common sense to equip him to work with all the people.

D. He should be conversant with the Southern Baptist Programs.

E. He should have a real love for people and a sincere desire to serve with them.

F. He should be a good leader, an effective preacher, able teacher, organizer and promoter.

II. CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT:

A. He shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the association with a 30 days notice.

B. He shall have 2-weeks vacation with pay, the time to be determined in consultation with the Promotion Committee.

C. He may be away from the association for 3 weeks for revivals and schools of missions. No more than 2 weeks of this time may be given to outside revivals. In each instance these meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Promotion Committee.

D. He will be limited to revivals in the associations only so far as they conflict with his basic responsibility.

E. It is understood that no church in the association will give him any remuneration for preaching, teaching, revivals, or any other church work. If he should receive any remuneration, he will give it to the associational treasury. Nothing in this section is intended to prohibit him receiving gift items from churches in the association for services rendered beyond the call of duty.

F. He may serve any church in the association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed 5 Sundays. At such a time the church should contribute to the associational treasury a reasonable remuneration for his services.

G. Since he will be serving as chaplain in at least one institution, he shall give to this institution an amount of his time which is commensurate with the supplement which is received from the State Board for this purpose. This institutional work shall not interfere with his responsibilities to the association.

III. DUTIES

A. General Duties

It shall be the duty of the Associational Missionary to respond within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to work with the associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the association; to promote missionary interest among the

churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.

B. Specific Duties

1. He shall have regularly scheduled monthly meetings with the Promotion Committee for the purpose of reviewing progress, initiating activities, and giving general oversight to the work of the association. This includes the drawing up of an annual calendar of activities which would be approved by the Executive Committee.

2. He shall give written reports as follows: monthly to the Promotion committee, quarterly to the Executive Committee, and annually to the Associational Meeting. Said report to include: number of sermons preached, churches visited, prayer services conducted, classes taught, committee meetings, conferences, miles traveled, days on field, conversions, and other pertinent information.

3. He shall publish an attractive, informative, and imaginative Newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Executive Committee members, associational officers, and general church officers.

4. He shall assist all leaders and committees in planning and promoting the associational program.

5. He shall cultivate the friendship and good will of those churches not fully cooperating with the association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in advancing the Kingdom of God.

6. He shall make himself available to any church which desires his concerted attention in analyzing, studying, planning and promoting the associational program.

7. While the present challenges in our association seem to lie primarily in strengthening the existing work rather than in the establishment of new missions, population growth and shifts may alter this. Therefore, the missionary shall be alert to the needs for mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local church.

8. He shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the association.

IV. FURTHER RECOMMENDATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS

A. We recommend that the missionary further enhance the spirit of fellowship and good will in the association by worshipping in the different churches as frequently as his schedule will allow. Such visits would be for the purpose of worship and to help create a spirit of involvement with the churches and the people. They should not be promotional visits.

B. It should be emphasized that the success of the missionary's efforts will depend in a very large measure upon the response, support, and cooperation of all the churches of our association.

After reading the foregoing report Mr. Kivett made a motion that we accept the recommendations and they were seconded and carried.

46. Ernest Poston, Chairman of Committee on Resolutions, gave

a report.

47. Dewitt Purvis read the report of the Nominating Committee in the absence of Mr. Glenn Crissman, Chairman.

48. Installing of Officers.

49. Max Gilmore offered the dedicatory prayer, thus ending the 15th Annual Meeting.

CONSTITUTION and BY-LAWS

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Sandhills Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of co-operating Missionary Baptist Churches within the area served by the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to the Committee on Reception of Churches, which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith and practice. Upon a vote of the Association, the church shall be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

The application of an established Missionary Baptist Church, co-operative member of an adjacent Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, shall upon recommendation of that Association, upon favorable recommendation of our Committee on Reception of Churches, and upon favorable vote of this Association, be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

Churches making application for membership into this Association between annual meetings may be voted on and admitted to full membership by a majority vote of the Executive Committee after investigation, approval and recommendation of the Committee on Reception of Churches.

Section 3 The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

Section 4. Any church may withdraw from this Association at its pleasure.

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) the members of all standing committees of the Association. The aforesaid officers, pastors and standing committee members shall constitute ex-officio messengers at large of the Association and exercise all rights

and privileges of duly elected messengers. (4) Three messengers from each cooperating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each fifty members or major fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to elect more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger or messenger at large who is not a member of a church which is a cooperating member of the Association. Messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A cooperating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

B. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the officers, pastors, members of standing committees, as messengers at large of the Association, and the duly elected messengers or their alternates present.

Section 3. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power to infringe on any of the internal rights of the individual churches. It may advise with the member churches and recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance and may claim for its objects and programs the highest consideration.

ARTICLE V. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers. The Officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian and three Trustees. The officers shall be elected at the annual meetings and installed during the afternoon session of the second day. They shall assume their duties immediately after installation and continue in office until their successors are installed. The moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one year terms in succession.

Section 2. Departments. The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Baptist Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, and the Department of Church Music. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary to the Association. The Department heads shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Committees. There shall be the following standing committees (1) Committee on Committees; (2) Committee on Constitution and By-Laws; (3) Executive Committee; (4) Nominating Committee; (5) Committee on Ordinations; (6) Committee on Place and Preacher; (7) Program Committee; (8) Promotion Committee; (9) Committee on Reception of Churches; (10) Committee on Resolutions.

Section 4. Employees. The Missionary and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole Program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction and be subject to the authority of the Executive Committee. They shall be nominated by the

promotion Committee and elected by the Executive Committee or the Association, in Annual Session.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present provided that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following By-Laws.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The **Moderator** shall preside over the sessions of the Association and see that order and decorum are observed by everyone present. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

Section 2. The **Vice Moderator** shall preside at the pleasure of the moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator.

Section 3 It shall be the duty of the **Clerk-Treasurer**

- (1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.

(3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.

(4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association. Disbursement shall be made in accordance with the budget adopted by the Association. Non-budgeted items must be approved by the Executive Committee.

(5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the **Historian** to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member Churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

Section 5. The **Trustees** shall hold title to all property of the Association. When authorized by the Executive Committee of the Association, they shall execute notes secured by mortgages and deeds of trust in the purchase of church sites or other property. The Trustees in all acts with respects to property purchased shall be controlled and directed by the Association through its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. The **Committee on Committees**, consisting of five members, shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee on Committees shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that

no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 2. The Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, consisting of four members shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Missionary, and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This Committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws as may be necessary to better serve the purposes of the Association.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall be composed of (1) the active pastors of member churches; (2) the officers of the Association; (3) the chairman of each standing committee of the Association as ex-officio members at large representing the Association on this committee; and (4) two members elected by each church. This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall hold quarterly meetings at times and places determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the event that regular members cannot attend Executive Committee meetings.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee, consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations for each office of the Association to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. The Committee on Ordination, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all Pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations, as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 6. The Committee to Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of meeting and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 7. The Program Committee, which shall consist of three members shall plan well in advance the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 8. The Promotion Committee shall consist of nine mem-

bers with the Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer serving as ex-officio members. The other six members to include a designated Chairman of the committee shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association. It shall be the duty of this committee, co-operating with the Missionary, to devise ways and means, recommended measures and initiate action, implementing promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association. It shall receive and disburse all Mission Club Funds. This committee shall at the Executive Meetings, bring regular reports regarding receipts, disbursements, progress made, and future plans for our Associational Missions Program.

Section 9. The Committee on Reception of Churches, composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrines, practices, and co-operation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement of its findings along with its recommendations shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Executive Committee as provided herein in Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution.

Section 10. The Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE III. PROCEDURE

All business shall be conducted and all discussions shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

Rev. John Steverson, Pastor of Red Branch Baptist Church, read Scripture and led in prayer.

A discussion of the Associational Mission's work was conducted by a panel made up of the following Associational Officers: Michael Ray, Associational Missionary; Bailey Hall, Sunday School Superin-

tendent; Charles Moseley, Training Union Director; Tilden Cheek, Brotherhood President; Mrs. Richard Hopkins, W.M.U. Representative, and Barry Lindley, Music Director.

The PRINTED REPORTS by the Associational Officers were adopted:

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY'S REPORT — 1964-65

Michael T. Ray

The Associational Missionary visited all the churches in the Association and did the following types of work: 49 sermons, assisted in the ordination services of two pastors and seven deacons, taught 7 Sunday School classes, spoke at 4 Brotherhood meetings, taught 6 study courses, led 10 Prayer services, showed slides and film strips 15 times, conducted two Vacation Bible Schools and assisted in one, attended 16 conferences outside the Association, conducted 12 Vesper Services at Morrison Training School, led 12 Bible Study sessions at Morrison, visited Robbins Rest Home 4 times, had 238 individual conferences, 59 group conferences and 29 Committee conferences, published the SANDHILLS NEWS BULLETIN 10 times, travelled 17,720 miles, published 1700 Calendar of Activities, provided biographical sketches of outside pastors to 6 churches, and in the absence of pastors assisted two churches in forming their pulpit committees, assisted one church with their yearly budget, and conducted one funeral service.

During the year two of our pastors, Rev. Darrell Cox of West End and Rev. J. W. Singletary, Ives Memorial Church, have completed the Pastoral Care Course at the North Carolina Baptist Hospital, Winston-Salem, N. C.

In March 1965, the Association started the Seminary Extension Center in Carthage with 30 men and women enrolled. In May the first graduation was held with 24 receiving certificates. In September the Center reopened with 15 students enrolled. Rev. Ernest Poston, George Sturch and Michael Ray are instructors.

In past years there have been only one Associational officer in the Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood and Music organizations. We are happy to announce that beginning this new year we have a full set of officers in the Brotherhood and Music organizations and several officers for the Sunday School and Training Union organizations.

The work at Morrison Training School has been most encouraging. During the year 111 boys have been counselled with, 107 have been enrolled in Bible study, 57 enrolled in V.B.S., and 22 have been baptized.

The work of the Pastor's Conference has been rather weak during the past year but we trust with a full set of new officers things will be better with all pastors feeling a real need of fellowship with others of like responsibility.

We welcome into our Association four new pastors and two minis-

ters of Music and Christian Education: Rev. Coy Frye, Highlands; Rev. Joe Babb, Cameron; Rev. J. Rumsey, New Home; Rev. Arlie Starnes, Pine Grove; Rev. Haskell Duncan, Southern Pines; and Mr. Barry Lindley, Aberdeen.

I wish to thank all of you who have so generously supported the Associational program and for your wonderful spirit of cooperation. I trust that we will provide the kind of programs and leadership that will be of help to your church. We request you to be an active participant in the Association, and to offer those suggestions that you think will be helpful in extending HIS Kingdom.

I want to thank the members of the First Baptist Church, Carthage, for providing office space for the missionary and for the fellowship I've enjoyed with them.

I trust that as we plan together, pray together, and work together in the coming year that we will be found in the center of HIS Will and that we shall all be working together for the strengthening of every church in our Association and for the glory of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING 1965 ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT

The day that North Carolina Baptist launched a ministry to the aging 14 years ago was a good day indeed. Since that time four Homes for the Aging have come into being, and a fifth one is in the making. Many elderly people have been blessed by this compassionate ministry through the years, and today 160 people are in residence at Resthaven, the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem, the Albemarle Home in Albemarle and the Hamilton Home in Hamilton. When the proposed new Home at Yanceyville is completed, there will be a capacity for 200. It is anticipated that construction will begin on the Yanceyville Home during 1965.

This labor of Christian love and nurture is ours together, and we could not operate without this concern, the prayers, and the financial

support of our Baptist people. This financial aid from the churches comes to us through two very vital avenues—the Special Day Offering, received on the third Sunday of February each year and the Co-operative Program. Special Day Offering receipts for 1964 were at an all-time high and exceeded \$96,000.00. Through these gifts we were able to supplement from 80 per cent to 90 per cent of our needy residents who could not be with us otherwise.

It is urgently hoped that the Special Day Offering for 1965 will be the greatest ever, especially in view of the pressing and ever-increasing needs of the aging in our midst who seek our help. The wait-list now is 175 and grows daily.

As the great heart of the Saviour yearns for all in the various areas of human need, we are grateful that He has commissioned us to include also a special ministry to the aged among us. We have responded to His plea, we are giving an answer to Him for these elderly who are very dear to Him, and we pray that every church in our State Baptist Convention will be very careful to give increasing emphasis to this vital ministry.

Many families are finding much happiness and a great opportunity for service in caring for foster children. The need for a home in the western part of the state, more adequately to serve the people west of the Blue Ridge Mountains, has been discussed in various meetings and conferences. The possibility of such a home is meeting with genuine interest and enthusiasm. Attention is currently being given to a suitable location.

Members of the Board of Trustees and members of the staff of the Children's Homes are committed to the task of maintaining a

Christian program of child care—a program that will merit the undivided support and loyalty of our people and that will bring honor to our Lord. To that end it is our purpose to meet, as effectively as possible, the challenge of our day.

Each day in the life of your Baptist Hospital is a day of opportunity to help those who cannot help themselves.
