ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY'S REPORT 1965-66

The year 1965-66 has been a busy and challenging one for me. Not only have I visited all the churches at least twice during the year but have had the opportunity of preaching and teaching in many of the churches. With from five to nine of our churches being without pastors during the year, I have met with Pulpit Committees supplying them with the pamphlet "When a Church is Seeking a Pastor" and assisting them in various ways. In June and September 1 assisted two churches that are without a pastor with their visitation during their revivals. This was not only helpful to the churches but helpful to the Missionary in getting to know the members of the churches. It was also a revelation to learn of the potential of these churches.

The <u>Seminary Extension Center</u> this year was in Southern Pines with 13m and women attending. This is a wonderful opportunity for both pastors and laity (men and women) to study and prepare for greater service in the churches. I trust more pastors will see the worth of these courses and urge their members to enroll. The next Seminary Extension courses will be offer

ed January 9-March 6, 1967, at the Carthage Baptist Church.

The Five-Year Spiritual Growth Program has been started in four churches thus far, and other churches are interested in learning more about the program. The next Five-Year Spiritual Growth Clinic will be held the 31st of October in Carthage. We believe this to be one of the best means of examining whereyour church IS at the present time, look at yourself objectively, set goals, and to urge you to "press toward the mark" which Christ would have your church to attain.

The work at Morrison Training School has again been challenging, as well as inspiring. Your missionary has charge of Vespers every first Sunday of the month at 9 A.M., Bible Study every first and third Tuesday night the month, and goes for counselling at least once or twice a month. Your Association sponsored a Vacation Bible School at Morrison with 104 boys volunteering to attend for the five days. On the last day of the School, 52 boys made commitments for Christ. Your missionary has been teaching them the book on THE NEW LIFE. I am grateful to Rev. Max Gilmore, Fred Richardson, James Daves, Coy Frye, Rodney Ludney for their help in the Vacation Bible School.

We are glad to welcome into our Association the following pastors: Rev. Johnnie Hooks, Piney Wood; Rev. Wilfred Powers, New Home; Rev. James Daves, Ives Memorial; Rev. William Hancock, Flint Hill; Rev. Grover Vaught Colonial Heights; Rev. Bobby Moore, Fairview; and Mr. Art Greene, Ministe of Religious Education of the First Baptist Church, Aberdeen, Rev. J. C.

Bennett, West End, & Rev. D. Hall, Palmair.

The great need of our churches is for more trained leadership, and we trust the Associational leaders in all departments will be able to assist all churches this coming year in this task. Please feel free to contact the leaders or myself and we shall be glad to help your church leaders and teachers.

A pressing need of each church in our Association is an undergirding of the Cooperative Program with prayer. Information on the world wide missionary work carried on through the Cooperative Program will form the

basis by which your church can pray with knowledge and zeal.

Today we are witnessing the greatest missionary advance in Southern Baptist history in missionaries being sent, benevolent work done and training young people for world wide service. This advance is being made through your missionaries, school orphanages, homes for the aged, and our Baptist Hospitals. Through the Cooperative Program you literally feed the hungry, clothe the nakes, heal the sick, and preach the gospel to the far corners of the earth. Each year more of our churches are increasing Cooperative Program giving and at the same time others are beginning to

participate whole heartely. Several associations in North Carolina have 00% of their churches giving through the Cooperative Program. According a available records our Association gave approximately \$10,176.94 for the irst six months of 1966. Ten churches have given nothing thus far, but we rust they too will begin to participate in this worthy Program.

We recommend:

1. That every church plan a stewardship program to subscribe and

horoughly promote the church's budget.

2. That we engage regularly in prayer for Cooperative Program causes and give special emphasis to prayer for these needs during the OCTOBER COOPERATIVE PROGRAM PRAYER EMPHASIS.

3. That the churches give regularly through the Cooperative Program.

4. That the churches give regularly to the Associational Missions, and hat each church will increase their amount as much as possible.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

Reflection on the past year of life in our four Baptist Homes for the Aging is a reminder once again of the goodness of the Lord to us. During this time we have ministered to 172 deserving older men and women. All of these have been blessed by the love of North Carolina Baptist, through our share in the Cooperative Program. The large majority, at least 85%, have benefitted directly from these gifts and have actually been sustained at the point of their financial need. The Special Day offering for 1966 is at an all time high and looks as if it might be \$100,000.00 for the first time. This is very good, and we are profoundly grateful.

We are in the midst of miracles, and the past year has been one in which we have witnessed unusual blessings from the Lord. There have been fewer deaths than previously, and the critically ill, in many instances, have been brought back to a measure of reasonably good health. Nursing care has been of the highest quality, and you would rejoice to know now far your concern and your gifts go in ministering to the needs of residents, particularly at the point of tender loving care in illness.

It is anticipated that construction will begin on the fifth Home at Yancyville during the coming year, and when it is completed, we will be able to minister in all of our Homes to 200 older men and women and relieve, in

measure, the terrific pressure of a long waiting list of 170 people.

This ministry of love, in Christ's name, is dependent upon the concern, the love, the prayers, and the increased financial support of North Carolina Baptist. We are, therefore, going to count heavily on you and believe that you will not disappoint the aging people who are looking to you urgently for help.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

This has been a good year in Baptist Foundation work and we are eternally grateful to each one of you for having a part in promoting the work.

We are indeed grateful to the pastors of this state for the wonderful cooperation they have accorded the Baptist Foundation. They have encouraged us greatly by furnishing the names of individuals who may be interested in the

Foundation; they have invited us to their church to speak on various occassions; they have been most generous with their time in discussing with us th problems, programs, and purposes of the Foundation whenever we had the opportunity to discuss it with them. We covet your continued prayers for this work and hope in the future you will make use of the faciliti of The North Carolina Baptist Foundation.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES

Under the impact of the life, ministry and teachings of Christ and under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, North Carolina Baptist, eighty-one years ago launched a Christian ministry of child care. This has grown considerably and is widely recognized for its qualities of service and pioneering spirit. Sons and daughters of the Children's Homes are scattered throughout the world. They are actively engaged in all walks of life and are making a significant contribution to the uplift of mankind as a result of their early Christian training made possible by North Carolina Baptist and other friend

As we continue to build upon foundations already laid, special attention is being given certain areas of child care. An already strong program of group care is being strengthened at Mills Home, Kennedy Home and Odum Home. A good degree of progress has been realized in working with emotionally disturbed children at Greer Home in Chapel Hill. The demonstration Child Development Program for preschool children, conducted on the Mills Home campus, has had an excellent first year operation. Prospects are encouraging for a home for children in the western part of the state more adequately to serve the needs of our people who live west of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Constant attention is being given to more effective ways of meeting the highly specialized needs of children coming out of broken and inadequate home situations.

We have a large number of good Christian homes for the care of foster children. More are needed in all sections of the state. Foster homes serv children of all ages and are of particular advantage for some who have spec needs. Couples with or without children of their own who have an abundance of love find this to be a challenging and rewarding opportunity of Christian service.

Sincere appreciation is expressed to all who have, in any way, helped to support our child care ministry. We are indeed grateful for increasing income through the Cooperative Program. Last year's Thanksgiving Offering is approaching three hundred fifteen thousand dollars, and is the largest even Special gifts and designations such as the Once-a-month offering continue to provide a substantial part of our income. Through estate planning and making of Christian wills an increasing number of individuals and families are investing in present and future generations of boys and girls who are in need of the services of the Baptist Children's Homes. Roger Williams, former pastor of the Mills Home Baptist Church, is devoting full time to working with our Baptist people in this area, and he or other members of our staff will count it a privilege to assist you in exploring this field of Christian stewardship.

N.C. BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Our Baptist Hospital and Medical School are a center of healing for ody, mind and spirit, a center of training of medical personnel and Chrisian workers, and a center of scientific research for the advancement of medical care.

Without a vast amount of medical research, there would be no heart surgery today by which lives are saved in our Baptist Hospital almost every week; and the same would be true of almost every new method of treating us when we are sick. Without schools for the training of doctors, nurses, technicians and others, there soon would be no skilled persons in our hospitals or in our communities to care for us when illness comes. Without a staff of highly trained and experienced specialist and a vast amount of expensive specialized equipment, our Baptist Hospital could not offer the skilled medical care which is available to us when serious illness strikes and a fine medical center is needed. Another very important fact is that the skilled medical care of our Hospital is made available to people who need it and cannot pay for it. These important services are the work of our Medical Center in Winston-Salem.

The kind of medical care provided by our Hospital is very expensive, and the Hospital has no choice but to ask full payment of all who can pay. The Hospital has been spending in free care for our people far more than it receives from our Mother's Day Offerings, the Cooperative Program, and all welfare agencies combined. This has caused the Hospital to run into debt the past two years and the same has been happening this year. Of course, the Hospital simply cannot continue to operate this way. Medicare is not going to change the situation greatly. Our people need to understand this and to recognize that we are going to have to provide much greated support if the Hospital is to continue to provide free service in the same measure for those who cannot pay for it.

We trust you will return to your churches and give them this information and lead them to give serious consideration to the Hospital's vital min-

istry and its urgent need.





Constitution and By-Laws

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Sandhills Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Missionary

Baptist Churches within the area served by the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to the Committee on Reception of Churches, which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith and practice. Upon a vote of the Association, the church shall be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

The application of an established Missionary Baptist Church, cooperative member of an adjacent Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, shall upon recommendation of that Association, upon favorable recommendation of our Committee on Reception of Churches, and upon favorable vote of this Association, be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

Churches making application for membership into this Association between annual meetings may be voted on and admitted to full membership by a majority vote of the Executive Committee after investigation, approval and recommendation of the Committee on Reception of Churches.

Section 3. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from

any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

Section 4. Any church may withdraw from this Association at its pleasure.

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) the members of all standing committees of the Association. The aforesaid officers, pastors and standing committee members shall constitute ex-officio messengers at large of the Association and exercise all rights and privileges of duly elected messengers. (4) Three messengers from each cooperating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each fifty members or major fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to elect more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger or messenger at large who is not a member of a church which is a cooperating member of the Association. Messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A cooperating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

B. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the officers, pastors, members of standing committees, as messengers at large of the Association, and the duly elected messengers or their alternates present.

Section 3. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power to infringe on any of the internal rights of the individual churches. It may advise with the member churches and recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance and may claim for its objects and programs the highest consideration.

ARTICLE V. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers. The Officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian and three Trustees. The officers shall be elected at the annual meetings and installed during the afternoon session of the second day. They shall assume their duties immediately after installation and continue in office until their successors are installed. The moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one year terms in succession.

Section 2. Departments. The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Baptist Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, and the Department of Church Music. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary to the Association. The Department heads shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Committees. There shall be the following standing committees (1) Committee on Committees; (2) Committee on Constitution and By-Laws; (3) Executive Committee; (4) Nominating Committee; (5) Committee on Ordinations; (6) Committee on Place and Preacher; (7) Program Committee; (8) Promotion Committee; (9) Committee on Reception of Churches; (10) Committee on Resolutions; (11) Finance and Audit Committee.

Section 4. Employees. The Missionary and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole Program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction and be subject to the authority of the Executive Committee. They shall be nominated by the Promotion Committee and elected by the Executive Committee or the Association, in Annual Session.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of twothirds of the messengers present provided that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following By-Laws.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Moderator shall preside over the sessions of the Association and see that order and decorum are observed by everyone present. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms. He shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the association.

Section 2. The Vice Moderator shall preside at the pleasure of the

moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Clerk-Treasurer

(1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.

(3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents

belonging to the Association.

(4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association. Disbursement shall be made in accordance with the budget adopted by the Association. Non-budgeted items must be approved by the Executive Committee.

(5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member

durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the membe Churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

Section 5. The Trustees shall hold title to all property of the Association. When authorized by the Executive Committee of the Association, they shall execute notes secured by mortgages and deeds of trust in the purchase of church sites or other property. The Trustees in all acts with respects to property purchased shall be controlled and directed by the Association through its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Committee on Committees, consisting of five members, shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee on Committees shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 2. The Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, consisting of four members shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Missionary, and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This Committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws as may be necessary to better

serve the purposes of the Association.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall be composed of (1) the active pastors of member churches; (2) the officers of the Association; (3) the chairman of each standing committee of the Association as ex-officio members at large representing the Association on this committee; and (4) two members elected by each church. This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it

may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the event that regular members cannot attend Executive Committee meetings. This Committee shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee, consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations for each office of the Association to the

annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. The Committee on Ordination, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all Pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations, as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 6. The Committee Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of meeting and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 7. The Program Committee, which shall consist of three members shall plan well in advance the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers

and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 8. The Promotion Committee shall consist of nine members with the Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer serving as exofficio members. The other six members to include a designated Chairman of the committee shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Missionary, to devise ways and means, recommended measures and initiate action, implementing promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association. It shall receive and disburse all Mission Club Funds. This committee shall at the Executive Meetings, bring regular reports regarding receipts, disbursements, progress made, and future plans for our Associational Missions Program.

Section 9. The Committee on Reception of Churches, composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrines, practices, and co-operation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement of its findings along with its recommendations shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Executive Committee as provided herein in Article II, Section 2 of the

Constitution.

Section 10. The Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members shall draw-up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

Section 11. The Finance and Auditing Committee shall be composed of seven (7) members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six (6) different churches of the Association chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented more than two (2) consecutive years. No more than four (4) members of this Committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw-up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Executive Committee for their approval prior to its presentation at the Annual Associational Meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial matters It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make proper annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE III. PROCEDURE

All business shall be conducted and all discussions shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Eighteenth Annual Session of the Sandhills Baptist Association convened with the Unity Grove Baptist Church, Thursday, October 12, 1967, and with the First Baptist Church, Carthage, Friday, October 13, 1967.

THURSDAY NIGHT SESSION

Mr. Fleet Allen, Moderator, called the session to order.

The group sang "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" led by Joe Babb. Mrs. W. K. Carpenter accompanied at the piano.

Rev. A. T. Robertson, pastor of Ashley Heights Baptist Church, con-

ducted devotions and led in prayer.

Dewitt Purvis, Associational Clerk, had a roll call of churches and 26

were represented.

New Pastors were recognized: Harvey Beeler, Unity Grove and Taylor Memorial Churches; A. T. Robertson, Ashley Heights; Ernest Stiles, Vass; Fulton Thomas, Ephesus and Lemon Springs; Gene Booker, Robbins, First Church; William Hancock, Flint Hill Baptist Church.

Motion passed that Program as printed be the order of business for the

meeting.

The Moderator recognized Max Gilmore who read the proposed change of the Associational Constitution and By-Laws.

Joe Babb, the Associational Music Director, led the group in singing "A

Charge to Keep I Have."

Mr. Allen recognized Dr. Raymond Stone, President of the Sandhills Community College, who introduced the speaker, Dr. Howard Ford who is the Director of the Division of Missions of the State Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

Special music was furnished by the choir of Cameron Baptist Church.

Dr. Howard Ford presented the Message: "The Church Fulfilling Its

Mission Through the Ministry of the State Baptist Convention."

Mr. Allen recognized Mr. Jimmy Morris, Secretary of the Programs Service Department of the State Baptist Convention of North Carolina, who showed films of State Missions.

The bendiction was pronounced by Rev. Harvey Beeler, pastor of the Unity Grove Baptist Church.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The Second Session of the Sandhills Baptist Association was called to order by the Vice-Moderator, Max Gilmore.

Rev. James Daves led the group in singing the hymn, "To The Work."

Rev. Ernest Stiles conducted the devotion and led in prayer.

The Vice-Moderator recognized Fleet Allen who read the Proposed Change of the Constitution and By-Laws for the second reading, and this was adopted as read.

CONSTITUTION and BY-LAWS REVISION COMMITTEE REPORT

Request from various sources have been made to this Committee concerning revision in and/or amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws of our Association. After due consideration of these request, your Committee makes the recommendations as follows:

FIRST

That Section I of Article I of the By-Laws be amended by adding thereto: "He shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the association. "

SECOND

That the one (1) sentence in Section 3 of Article II of the By-Laws having to do with the time and place of the Executive Committee meetings, be revised to read as follows:

"This Committee shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar."

THIR.D

That Section 11 of Article II of the By-Laws be revised to read as follows: "Section 11. The Finance and Auditing Committee. This Committee shall be composed of seven (7) members, including the Associational Treasurer and representating at least six (6) different churches of the Association chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented more than two (2) consecutive years. No more than four (4) members of this Committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw-up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Executive Committee for their approval prior to its presentation at the Annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial matters. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make proper annual report to the Association."

(NOTE: Since the Associational Moderator and Missionary are ex-officio members of all standing committees, the total membership of this Committee would be (9)....)

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY'S REPORT 1966-67

This year I would like to deviate from the "usual" kind of report and instead tell something about the different kinds of ministries your Association offers. If any church would like for me to speak in your church concerning the ministries a phone call will be appreciated.

MINISTRY OF FELLOWSHIP: Through the Association men, women, boys and girls are bound together by common ties of belief, tradition, cooperate responsibility and love. We realize this Ministry of Fellowship at Associational Meetings... Executive Committee, Rallies, Clinics and Annual Associational Meetings. Through the years we have been bound together by the bond of Christian Fellowship...through getting together, working together and praying together.

MINISTRY OF PREACHING: During the past year the missionary has had the privilege of preaching in all but two churches of the Association. He has taken his time of preaching on Radio Station WEEB as well as speaking

at other Associational meetings, camps and assemblies.

TEACHING MINISTRY: Besides teaching Sunday School often in the churches, your missionary has taught several Study Courses and the January Bible Study. There were 14 persons enrolled in the Seminary Extension Course this past January with Rev. James Daves teaching. The coming School of Missions will be an opportunity to study missions: Associational, State, Home and Foreign.

TRAINING MINISTRY: Through Vacation Bible School Clinic, Music Clinic, Training Union Clinic, Baptist Men's Clinic and Evangelism Clinic

we are trying to help train the leaders of our churches.

COUNSELING MINISTRY: The pastors of our Association are overworked. During the year some pastors have referred members to the missionary for counseling. Pastors seek the help and listening ear of your

missionary.

CONSULTATION MINISTRY: The missionary is constantly being consulted by pulpit committees both in this Association as well as from other Associations. He is consulted by building committees interested in building new buildings, renovating and improving buildings and grounds; he is constantly being consulted by State and Southern Baptist Convention personnel about various churches in the Association, curriculum, personnel, etc.

PUBLICITY MINISTRY: The Sandhills Baptist Bulletin is published monthly which tells of news of the churches, projects of the Convention as well as the Association, items that should be of interest to individuals of the churches and news of the Association. The "Bulletin" is being sent to

men in the Military whose names have been given.

PASTORAL MINISTRY: For those churches without pastors, the mis-

sionary has preached, visited, counseled, and conducted funerals.

PENAL MINISTRY: For the past three years the Association has been ministering to the boys at Morrison Training School at Hoffman, North Carolina. Your Missionary conducts Vespers the first Sunday of each month, counsels with all boys who indicate a spiritual problem or who makes a profession of faith in Jesus Christ, and teaches two Bible Study classes each month. During the past year a Vacation Bible School was conducted for 74 boys.

For the past few months your missionary has been visiting the Prison Unit at the McCain Sanatorium and conducting Worship Services each Sunday morning. At the present time two patients at McCain are studying Bible

Courses.

There is still another ministry that the Association offers....

The MINISTRY OF LOVE: That which we do in the Association we do because we LOVE Jesus Christ, our brethren, and those who are lost. If in all the other ministries we perform, there is no love then "It profiteth us nothing."

On May 20, 1967, the Brotherhood held a Retreat for Baptist Men and their wives at the American Legion Hut, Carthage, from 3:30 p.m. 'til 7:00 p.m. The men and women from the Fairview Baptist Church were host and provided a good mean for all who attended. This period of spiritual renewal was highlighted by the testimony in word and song of Mr. Cosmo Pleche, a former night club entertainer from Concord, North Carolina.

7. On June 24, 1967, an Associational Retreat for Baptist Men and Boys was held at the Pinebluff Lake from 3:00 p.m. until 7:30 p.m. William Deaton directed this retreat and a "dutch treat" picnic was enjoyed by all.

8. One new Baptist Men's group was organized at the Carthage Baptist Church this year.

MUSIC DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Reflecting a growing awareness of the importance to the ministry of the church the Sandhills Baptist Association music ministry showed outstanding growth. Under the able leadership of Rev. Haskell Duncan of Southern Pines a well supported school of music was held February 6-10, 1967, at the First Baptist Church, Carthage. Thirteen churches of the Association were represented with a total enrollment of ninety-one. Classes and instructors were: Playing, Mr. Charles Gatwood, Associate Music Director, North Carolina Baptist State Convention; Reading, Mr. Haskell Duncan, Southern Pines; Directing, Mrs. Max Gilmore, Beulah Hills Baptist Church, Pinehurst; Music in Worship, Mr. Charles Story, Kannapolis, North Carolina.

All churches of the Association reported at least one choir for 1966 with a total enrollment of 617, and seven churches reported multiple choirs. A breakdown of the age groups is as follows: Beginners 21; Primaries 57; Juniors 80; Intermediates 54; Young People 36; Adults 212 in addition to several special groups.

Two events of importance are scheduled for the coming year: First, an Associational Choir for the Evangelistic Rally to be held at the Union Pines High School Auditorium, March 3, 1968. Second, an Associational Hymn Festival, the date of which will be announced later. All choir leaders are urged to plan to prepare for both these events.

STEWARDSHIP PROMOTION REPORT

Despite the fact that Southern Baptists have been sharing the Gospel through the Cooperative Program since 1925 many do not know what this plan is. The Question "WHAT IS THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM?" is often heard.

The answer is simple. What the budget is to the local church, the COOPERATIVE PROGRAM is to the denomination. It is the support of all missionary causes at home and abroad...it's preaching the gospel... it's the healing in the name of Jesus through hospitals and clinics everywhere... it is the teaching and training of Christian leaders for all the great tasks of the Kingdom endeavor.

As our people worship with tithes and offerings Sunday after Sunday and as the local church channels a part of its income through the COOPERATIVE PROGRAM we enter partnership with God and one another in obedience to the

command, "Go, Preach... Teach."

Let us resolve to pray earnestly for all Kingdom work and support our

prayers with sacrificial giving of self and substance.

Last year North Carolina Baptists gave \$5,787,311 through the COOPERATIVE PROGRAM. Supplementing this with Special Offerings amounting to \$2,897,639, we had a total of \$8,684,950 for all mission causes. Two associations had 100% of their churches giving through the COOPERATIVE PROGRAM.

According to our records, our Association gave \$24,345 during the last year for World Missions through the Cooperative Program. We also gave \$16,237 as designated gifts to Foreign, State, Home and Associational Missions.

We recommend:

1) That each church plan, vigorously promote, and subscribe a worthy budget.

2) That special emphasis be given to prayer for COOPERATIVE PROGRAM causes during October.

3) That each church give regularly through the Cooperative Program.

4) That in response to the special call of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention we increase our Cooperative Program giving at least 10% during the coming year.

5) That each church feel free to call upon the Stewardship Representative during the coming year to come and present any part of the Stewardship program.

EVANGELISM REPORT

This past year the churches of the Association baptized 159 persons. We are grateful to God for every person who has been brought to confess Jesus Christ as Lord. We call upon our churches to give themselves to the work that brought Christ from heaven to earth, Evangelism. Evangelism is the heart of the churches' existence. Evangelism must be two pronged thrust: we must publically proclaim the Gospel, that it is the power of God unto salvation, and we must personally win others to Christ. "Every Christian, a Witness" is more than a slogan, it must be a reality in our lives.

Our churches face a tremendous evangelistic challenge in the Crusade of the Americas. This is more than just a two-week period of revivals. It is an emphasis on evangelism that should occupy our churches throughout 1968-69 and '70'. Our churches have been challenged by one mission field, Brazil, to give ourselves to the work of evangelism and world missions for 1968-69. Some of the challenges in the CRUSADE OF AMERICAS are:

NATION-WIDE EMPHASIS ON PRAYER: Two days of Prayer, January 14, 1968 and January 12, 1969. PACT: A program of "Prayer Partners" with individuals, groups, and churches on the "Other Americas" initiated in August, 1968; Watch Night Prayer Service, December 31, 1968.

NATION-WIDE SEARCH FOR PROSPECTS: May, June, July, and

August 1968.

NATION-WIDE VISITATION WITNESSING:

September-November, 1968.

NATION-WIDE CRUSADE OF AMERICAS REVIVALS: March 16-30, 1969 (This is the date of the Sandhills Baptist Association); April 6-20; April 27-May 11, 1969.

NATION-WIDE EMPHASIS ON NEW MEMBER ORIENTATION: Following the Crusade of the Americas Revivals. Study book, "Daring Disciple-

ship" and launch new member orientation.

SPECIAL EMPHASIS IN NORTH CAROLINA ON CHRISTIAN MATURITY: January-December 31, 1970.

Adequate guidance material for cooperation with and in preparation for the Crusade of the Americas is provided in the 1967-69 Evangelism Plan Book already available to us from the Division of Evangelism, 301 Hillsboro

Street, Raleigh, North Carolina 27603.

The Special Day Offering, 1967, is an all-time high, but with the high cost of living and the maintenance of the new Home and the care of 30 additional residents at Yanceyville, a crisis could be had during the coming year, if the gifts from our Baptists do not increase in proporation to our needs.

We with to thank all Baptists who have enabled us to minister to the aging in Christ's name, and we want all of you to know that each of your five Homes exists for the people from all over our great state. We could not operate without your love, prayers, concern and your financial support.

At the Children's Homes we seek to provide the proper atmosphere, encouragement, and supervision to assure the development of inborn, God given talents of our children.

The Children's Homes offers a variety of quality services to the children of families who have not been able to continue a satisfactory pattern of living together. There are 33 cottages on five campuses that provide group care; two residents for emotionally disturbed children, convenient to a great medical center where psychiatric services are available. This fall a single cottage at Wallburg is being opened for the rehabilitation of boys.

In addition to group homes, the needs of many children are met through the use of foster homes. Many families find happiness and opportunity for service in caring for foster children. Should you have an "extra measure of love" to share in this way the Home would like to know of your interest.

Regional case worker centers provide staff for counseling services to distressed families. A new family living cottage has just been completed for brothers and sisters to use. The Child Development Center at Mills Home serves the local community as a means of strengthening family life and to provide a demonstration and information for churches interested in starting weekday care and education for preschool children.

The Board of Trustees and the staff are committed to the task of maintaining a Christian Program for Child Care... a program that will merit your support and loyalty and that will bring favor to our Lord.

We appreciate the prayers, gifts and support the Baptists have given over

the years.





REPORTS

MISSIONARY'S REPORT

Immediately following the 1967 Annual Associational Meeting we began our School of Mission. Fourteen churches participated and each church re-

ceiving real blessings which they are continuing to count.

During the year the Missionary has taught several mission study courses and the January Bible Study. Each time he has taught a Study Course the inviting church has invited other churches to participate and this has proven fine.

A carry-over from the previous year, the missionary continued to serve as chaplain at the Prison Unit of the McCain Sanatorium until the end of March 1968, when the work was turned over to Rev. A. T. Robertson of Ashley Heights.

The Evangelistic Rally in March with Dr. Charles Howard and Rev. William Lamb was both a challenge and inspiration to all who attended. We praise God for these men and for all who attended this meeting.

March 23-30, 1968, your missionary helped in the Randolph Association with their School of Mission.

In May Rev. Tom Green of Raleigh was invited to speak at our Baptist Men's Rally but due to car trouble he could not get here, but this did not deter our men and we had one of the best spontaneous meetings many of the men could recall. This was a time of sharing, praising and praying..something needed by all.

Your Associational worker has had the opportunity and privilege of preaching several ordination messages for new Deacons during the past year. The need for Spirit filled Deacons today is our great need; men who know their duties and led of God in these duties. Every church should provide their deacons with either Naylor book, "The Baptist Deacon" of Foshees book entitled, "The Ministry of the Deacon".

During the past summer 24 of the 27 churches had Vacation Bible Schools. We trust that for 1969 every church will have a VBS and if help should be

needed the Associational Sunday School Leaders will be glad to help.

Morrison Training School had another Vacation Bible School this year with 74 boys attending. For the first time in four years the Sandhills Baptist Association furnished only two workers. Mr. Art Green, the Associational Sunday School Superintendent and Mr. Ray. At the conclusion 22 boys made decisions for Christ and follow up classes were conducted for these boys for eight weeks after the Bible School.

In the spring the missionary taught a course for 45 counselors at Morrison Training School "The Principles of Teaching and Learning". These counselors are responsible for teaching Sunday School classes each Sunday and this course was to prepare these men and women that they might do a

better job.

This year has been a year when Revival has been breaking out even before the meetings began. The Spirit of the Crusade of the Americas has already been felt in many of the churches. Brother pastors have been helping brother pastors as never before. This has been a year of decision for many men, women, boys and girls and we continue to praise God.

This year we have had three fine Executive Committee Meetings. The attendance has been exceptionally good, the programs interesting and provoking, often prepared by different departmental leaders. We trust that in the coming year more members of the Executive will become more involved

in the work and service of the Association.

A word of thanks to all departmental heads and Chairman of Committees for the work they have done during the past year. (Please refer to their reports found in this book of Reports). To those of you who have served so faithfully in other capacities of the Association; to those of you who have been upholding us in your prayers; and for those of you who seek to serve Him more fully in the coming year we say thanks, and may God bless you.

Two of our men...Mr. Joe Lennon and Rev. Fulton Thomas, have visited foreign fields this past summer, Mr. Lennon attended the Crusade of the Americas Conference in Brazil and Rev. Thomas went to Columbia on a preaching tour. We look forward to these two men telling and sharing their ex-

periences.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

This is a full year at the Baptist Hospital with more than thirty thousand sick people being given medical service and Christian ministry, and more than 165,000 visits being made to the clinics of the hospital. In addition to this, more than 700 persons are receiving training in the various fields of medical care and Christian service, and a vast amount of medical research is being done in the cause and treatments of the diseases which afflict us and our loved ones.

The Development Program, which greatly increases the capacity of the

Medical Center to train and to serve, is progressing on schedule.

The cost of this large Development Program is being provided by interested individuals, corporations, foundations and government agencies, which recognize the valuable service our Medical Center is rendering and the urgent need for greatly enlarging these services.

This has been a very difficult year financially, and our hospital has been forced to make important changes in its financial policies. The amount of the free services now will have to be governed by the amount of the Mother's Day Fund. A patient's hospital bill will be estimated in advance, any available hospital insurance will be deducted, and the balance must be paid before the patient is admitted unless he is certified by his county welfare department or some other agency. Any balance beyond the estimated bill must be paid before the patient is discharged. In case of an emergency, the patient may be admitted but the hospital bill must be paid as soon as possible after admission. The Mother's Day Fund will be used as it has been to pay the difference between the amount paid by the certifying agency and the total cost of caring for the patient.

The great concern at our Baptist Hospital is for these patients who must have financial assistence if they are to get the specialized care they need, but the hospital has come to the point that it cannot continue to operate without the money necessary to cover the cost. In view of the circumstances, we believe the great majority of our pastors and our people will understand these changes and will give their full cooperation. The Mother's Day Offering will need to be increased greatly if our hospital is to fulfill its mission to our people who most need it. We want to assure our hospital that it can de-

pend upon us in full measure.

FOUNDATION REPORT

During the past year, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. has made regular and systematic progress. More and more of our Baptist people are inquiring about the services of the Foundation and are following these inquiries with concrete evidence of their concern. Some have made direct monetary contributions through the Foundation for a particular agency or institution. Others, with the help of their lawyers, have made provisions in their wills that through the Foundation Christian causes have been remembered.

One of our major emphases has been in the area of will making. Our pastors, associational superintendents or missionaries, and our church representatives have given encouraging help in this educational campaign. The response in each instance, whether in an association or individual church,

has been most gratifying.

We solicit your prayers and your continuing cooperation. The Foundation remains ready to assist you in any phase of your endeavors. Please call on us if we can be of assistance to you.

DEPARTMENT OF PROGRAM SERVICES REPORT

The Department of Program Services promotes the total Baptist program and is primarily a public relations agency incorporated in the Divisions of Stewardship Promotions.

During the past year, the department booked more than 12,000 free rental films and has a film library of over 2,500 titles covering every area of de-

nominational endeavor.

The department has prepared and catalogued some 800 color slides for

use in illustrating various ministries of state Baptist work.

The department produces the T.V. network series, "A Light Unto My Path", a mission work designed to reach the deaf, the aging and unchurched. Beside the various state-wide networks, it is carried in nine other states outside North Carolina. The department also produces a weekly T.V. program for pre-school children called BIBLE STORY TIME and another 30 minute color news program called CHURCH OF OUR FATHERS.

The department has two approved summer workers at the summer assemblies, who show more than 300 films each year. Equipment and supplies for the season at both Fruitland and Casewell are provided through the department.

We assist the Department of Town and Country Missions in the presentation of filmed messages in the resort areas of Nags Head, Atlantic Beach, Ocean Isle, White Lake and Lake Norman.

INTERRACIAL COOPERATION REPORT

The Department has experienced growth in practically every area during 1968. In January a record number of General Baptist attended the statewide Vacation Bible School Clinic at Wingate College. A series of five conferences on human relations were held in April with a total attendance of 800.

Thirteen small scholarships were provided this year for ministerial students at Shaw University, North Carolina College, A. & T. University and Southeastern Seminary. Three new Week Day programs were held during

the summer in churches located in Asheville and Brevard.

Looking forward toward 1969, the annual statewide conference on evangelism meeting in Greensboro in January will be jointly sponsored by the two Baptist Conventions. Also in keeping with the Crusade of the Americas the Baptist Men and Boys annual convention for the first time next year will be jointly sponsored by the Brotherhood Department of the Baptist State Convention and the Laymen's League of the General Baptist State Convention. This meeting is scheduled in Winston-Salem March 28-29, 1969.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

North Carolina Baptist and other friends of the Children's Homes are making possible a Christian way of life for hundreds of boys and girls who otherwise would be denied many of life's best opportunities. More than 1300 children were assisted in some type of service during the past year.

All associated with the Children's Homes are deeply grateful for every type of support. Cooperative Program income through the churches is increasingly important. Last year's Thanksgiving offering is the largest evernow approaching \$325,000.00. Special gifts, bequest through wills and estates planning provide much needed income and wonderful opportunities to invest in the lives of children and young people.

Encouraging progress is being made in the capital funds campaign to build a home for children in Western North Carolina to be located in Haywood County between Waynesville and Clyde. It is hoped that construction can be-

gin in early 1969.

Four family style cottages have been constructed and dedicated during the past year - two at Mills Home and two at Kennedy Home. Two additional cottages will be constructed at Mills Home during the coming year. Funds for these buildings have come from bequest through estates planning by friends of neglected and dependent children.

The number of good Christian homes for the care of foster children is growing. More are needed in all sections of the state. Couples with or without children of their own, who have an abundance of love, find this to be a

challenging and rewarding opportunity for Christian service.

We covenant with you to face the future as we have the past: to offer Christian nurture to children in distress in the name of Christ our Saviour and Lord.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES

The past year in the Baptist Homes for the Aging has been one of the most eventful in the history of the Homes. Of primary significance was the opening of the Yanceyville Home on November 1, 1967, and the dedicatory service on April 25, 1968, with Governor Dan K. Moore as the principal speaker.

When the Yanceyville Home, accommodating 31 residents, is filled to capacity, the number living in all of our Homes will reach 200. Residents at Yanceyville, Resthaven, the Albemarle Home, the Hayes Home, the Hilton Home, and the Infirmary constitute a large and ever-growing family of elderly

people who receive compassionate and tender care.

Baptist of North Carolina can be grateful for their record in ministering to the residents in their five Homes for the Aging. About 85% of the resident ministered unto receive assistance through the love gifts of North Carolina. These love gifts from our Baptist churches come from two main sources: (1) The Special Day offering, received on the third Sunday of February each year, from which the Homes derive 22 1/2% of their total support; (2) The Cooperative Program from which 12 1/2% of total income. Gifts for 1967 through these two sources were at an all time high and amounted to around \$200,000.00. The Special Day Offering, at this time, is reflecting an encouraging increase. Unless these two vital sources of income are increased considerably, your Baptist Homes cannot be maintained, either on the basis of quality of care or quantity.

Everyone contributing to this great area of human need should be grateful to the Lord that he is a part of a great denomination that has had a vision to plan for the aging and is moving along forward in meeting the needs of this

deserving group.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The three-plan Southern Baptist Protection Program has one provision in Plan A that will affect all prospective new members soon; this provision is called "Delayed Participation", commonly known as "grace period". This will become effective on January 1, 1969. The provision of the grace date is established in one of three ways: (1) as of January 1, 1969; (2) on the members 26th birthday; or (3) one year from the date he first becomes eligible, whichever is the latter. It is imperative that all who are now eligible join the Program before January 1, 1969.

Inflation continues to affect the buying power of the dollar for everyone, including those who have retired. The Protection Program is designed to

help any church provide as much retirement income for the minister and staff as it desires. Many churches are moving to ten percent dues on total salary, recommended as a minimum by the Annuity Board and state convention secretaries.

As of December 31, 1967, 1,202 new members had been issued certificates in Plan "A" of the Protection Plan or Program. The total number of employes covered in the agency program was 7,140. Anyone interested in knowing more about the Protection Program please write Rev. Guy Cain, 301 Hillsboro Street, Raleigh, N.C.



Constitution and By-Laws

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Sandhills Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Missionary

Baptist Churches within the area served by the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to the Committee on Reception of Churches, which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith and practice. Upon a vote of the Association, the church shall be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

The application of an established Missionary Baptist Church, cooperative member of an adjacent Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, shall upon recommendation of that Association, upon favorable recommendation of our Committee on Reception of Churches, and upon favorable vote of this Association, be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

Churches making application for membership into this Association between annual meetings may be voted on and admitted to full membership by a majority vote of the Executive Committee after investigation, approval and recommendation of the Committee on Reception of Churches.

Section 3. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from

any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

Section 4. Any church may withdraw from this Association at its

pleasure.

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) the members of all standing committees of the Association. The aforesaid officers, pastors and standing committee members shall constitute ex-officio messengers at large of the Association and exercise all rights and privileges of duly elected messengers. (4) Three messengers from each cooperating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each fifty members or major fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to elect more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger or messenger at large who is not a member of a church which is a cooperating member of the Association. Messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A cooperating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

B. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the officers, pastors, members of standing committees, as messengers at large of the Association, and the duly elected messengers or their alternates present.

Section 3. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power to infringe on any of the internal rights of the individual churches. It may advise with the member churches and recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance and may claim for its objects and programs the highest consideration.

ARTICLE V. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers. The Officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian and three Trustees. The officers shall be elected at the annual meetings and installed during the afternoon session of the second day. They shall assume their duties immediately after installation and continue in office until their successors are installed. The moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one year terms in succession.

Section 2. Departments. The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Baptist Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, and the Department of Church Music. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary to the Association. The Department heads shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Committees. There shall be the following standing committees (1) Committee on Committees; (2) Committee on Constitution and By-Laws; (3) Executive Committee; (4) Nominating Committee; (5) Committee on Ordinations; (6) Committee on Place and Preacher; (7) Program Committee; (8) Promotion Committee; (9) Committee on Reception of Churches; (10) Committee on Resolutions; (11) Finance and Audit Committee.

Section 4. Employees. The Missionary and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole Program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction and be subject to the authority of the Executive Committee. They shall be nominated by the Promotion Committee and elected by the Executive Committee or the Association, in Annual Session.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of twothirds of the messengers present provided that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following By-Laws.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Moderator shall preside over the sessions of the Association and see that order and decorum are observed by everyone present. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms. He shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the association.

Section 2. The Vice Moderator shall preside at the pleasure of the

moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Clerk-Treasurer

(1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.

(3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents

belonging to the Association.

(4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association. Disbursement shall be made in accordance with the budget adopted by the Association. Non-budgeted items must be approved by the Executive Committee.

(5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by

the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member Churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

Section 5. The Trustees shall hold title to all property of the Association. When authorized by the Executive Committee of the Association, they shall execute notes secured by mortgages and deeds of trust in the purchase of church sites or other property. The Trustees in all acts with respects to property purchased shall be controlled and directed by the Association through its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Committee on Committees, consisting of five members, shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee on Committees shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 2. The Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, consisting of four members shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Missionary, and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This Committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws as may be necessary to better

serve the purposes of the Association.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall be composed of (1) the active pastors of member churches; (2) the officers of the Association; (3) the chairman of each standing committee of the Association as ex-officio members at large representing the Association on this committee; and (4) two members elected by each church. This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it

may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the event that regular members cannot attend Executive Committee meetings. This Committee shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee, consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations for each office of the Association to the

annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. The Committee on Ordination, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all Pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations, as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 6. The Committee on Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of meeting and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 7. The Program Committee, which shall consist of three members shall plan well in advance the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers

and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 8. The Promotion Committee shall consist of nine members with the Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer serving as exofficio members. The other six members to include a designated Chairman of the committee shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Missionary, to devise ways and means, recommended measures and initiate action, implementing promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association. It shall receive and disburse all Mission Club Funds. This committee shall at the Executive Meetings, bring regular reports regarding receipts, disbursements, progress made, and future plans for our Associational Missions Program.

Section 9. The Committee on Reception of Churches, composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrines, practices, and co-operation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement of its findings along with its recommendations shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Executive Committee as provided herein in Article II, Section 2 of the

Constitution.

Section 10. The Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members shall draw-up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

Section 11. The Finance and Auditing Committee shall be composed of seven (7) members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six (6) different churches of the Association chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented more than two (2) consecutive years. No more than four (4) members of this Committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw-up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Executive Committee for their approval prior to its presentation at the Annual Associational Meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial matters. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make proper annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE III. PROCEDURE

All business shall be conducted and all discussions shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

REPORTS

MISSIONARY'S REPORT

1968-69 has been a very busy and challenging year. Beside the regular routine duties there have been the Chaplaincy at Moore County Hospital, the Radio ministry over Station W. E. E. B., the ministry at the Cameron Morrison School at Hoffman, N. C., and the Prison ministry at McCain. Several churches have been without pastors and the missionary has been helping in the various ministries of these churches. Help has been given to pulpit committees and churches working on Constitutions.

In December your missionary was invited to attend the Southern Baptist Convention Planning and Program Conference in Nashville, Tennessee for a week. This meeting gave opportunity for him to work with other denomina-

tional leaders of the Convention in planning for the 70's.

The highlight of the Calendar year has been the Crusade of the Americas. Revivals were conducted in all churches during the months of March and May and there are indications of spiritual revival and awakening in our churches.

Our Youth have been active in many areas. "M" Night was conducted by the Church Training Department with the youth having planned the program. John Hickman, of Paraguay, a student at Wingate College, gave his testimony and presented a musical program. The Good News Singers of Fayetteville, N. C., presented the folk musical with several young people making decisions for Christ. The Youth Choir, under the leadership of Rev. Joe Babb, sang at several churches during the Crusade of the Americas Revivals.

This year very little has been done in the area of Sunday School on the Associational level due to the resignation of Mr. Art Green who moved to Virginia in November, 1968.

One of the best meetings we had was the Men and Boy's Retreat at Cliff Blue's Lake with 65 men and boys present. Chuck Cranford, a former inmate of Central Prison, gave his testimony and challenged the men and boys to live and witness for Christ.

This year we have lost only two pastors: Rev. A. T. Robertson, of Ashley Heights, resigned because of health; and Charles Moseley was called to the Great Bridge Baptist Church in Chesapeake, Virginia. Two new pastors have come: Rev. Donald Swinney to the Red Branch Baptist Church, and Rev. Robert Denton to the Ashley Heights Baptist Church. We welcome these men and their families into our Association. We look forward to the Rev. Ray Benfield and his family coming to the Carthage Baptist Church the first of November.

Your missionary has been working with both staff and boys of the Cameron Morrison School this past year. An eighteen hour Seminary Extension Course, "Survey of the Life of Christ", was taught to 21 staff members in October - December; and from March - May, another eighteen hour course, "A Historical Survey of Christianity", was taught to 14 staff members.

In June a Vacation Bible School for 60 boys was conducted. At the end of the School, 15 decisions for Christ were made. At the present time there are 45 boys enrolled in Bible Study. Each boy has received a copy of GOOD NEWS FOR MODERN MAN given by the ladies of the Cameron Baptist Church.

The Executive Committee has met three times this year. We appreciate the interest these men and women have shown in the work of the Association. We trust all members, both pastors and lay people, will support the Association with their prayers, talents and financial support.

We appreciate the faithfulness of our Music Director, Rev. Joe Babb; the Church Training Director, Wayne Adams, and his co-workers; Glenn Crissman and the men who worked so faithfully with the Baptist Men and the R. A.'s; and Mrs. G. P. Jones and the ladies who assisted her in the Woman's Missionary Work. Our appreciation to Rev. Fulton Thomas, Chairman of the Evangelism Committee and his work with the presentation of the Foreign Mission Study on Columbia, South America.

We offer THANKS to all who upheld us with your prayers and encouragements and know that without them and the Holy Spirit's guidance this work would be impossible. Continue to ask for God's Guidance and Leadership

in the workings of this Association.

A Training Clinic was held for all Associational Directors and Officers

at the Cameron Baptist Church in September.

The Annual Missionary Meeting was held at Bethlehem Baptist Church in April. Mrs. A. L. Stencil, of Rocky Mount, State G. A. Director, and Rev. and Mrs. Zeb Moss, home on furlough from Zambia, were the speakers.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Our Medical Center continues a high quality program of medical care, training of medical personnel, and research in the causes and treatment of the diseases which afflict us. In the face of serious financial problems, the hospital staff is working more diligently than ever to minister to our people in keeping with their needs and to limit of the hospital's resources.

The Hospital has instituted more efficient admission procedures regarding patients' financial resources and plans for payment of hospital bills. Trained counselors are interviewing patients and their families regarding advance payments which are now required and for getting more adequate information on those who will need help. In this way they are able better to discover those patients who may be eligible for medical assistance through social services department or other health agencies, and can start proceedings at once for getting these patients certified if this has not been done. Those agencies pay a major part of the cost for a patient they certify, but not the total cost, and the Mother's Day Fund must pay the balance. A member of the family must go to the agency and give the necessary information, and getting this done is often a real problem. Many pastors have helped in this connection and have rendered an important service for patient and the hospital.

If it were not for the help which comes from these health agencies, our Mother's Day Fund would not last three months. After paying the difference between what the agencies pay and the total cost for these patients, the Mother's Day Offerings are used to help as many as possible of those who are eligible for certification and who cannot pay the total cost of their care. First preference must be given to those patients whose needs are the greatest and most urgent. The free care the hospital gives must now be limited in keeping with the funds provided for this purpose, because the

hospital cannot continue to go deeper in debt.

It is important that our people understand that all the Mother's Day Offering and designated gifts for this ministry are used for this purpose alone, and the hospital makes them go as far as it possibly can. The Trustees and Administration of the hospital are most grateful for the fine cooperation our pastors and our people are giving, and they earnestly solicit our understanding and generous support.

STEWARDSHIP AND PROMOTION

When the word "stewardship" is used, most of us begin to see the dollar sign \$ \$. If we think of stewardship only in terms of money, we miss the mark of our concept. Stewardship means "responsibility"... in all areas of life. We are stewards or trustees of our time, talents, and abilities. The Christian attitude is that we are responsible beings and must one day give account to our Maker of all that He provides.

The worship of God with our tithes and offerings through the churches provides a way of expressing our gratitude for His blessings. One of the ways we support World Mission, Christian Education, and Social Services is through the Cooperative Program. On May 5th of this past year we had a Stewardship Development Seminar in our Association at which time various stewardship development plans and methods were explained. Those laymen and laywomen present were enlightened and inspired, and in the coming year plans are in the making to demonstrate various plans which every church may select and use as it seems best for that church.

As dedicated Christian stewards will you try to lead your church:

1. To use a stewardship program to help subscribe your own church budget?

2. To increase the percentage of the offering plate dollar given through the Cooperative Program?

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES

The Children's Homes, through a variety of quality services, is recognized as a family service agency ministering to more than 1200 children and their families annually. This program is carried on on six campuses and through the work of regional casework centers throughout the state.

More requests for services are now coming in to the Baptist Children's Homes than at any time in our previous history. All agency beds are

filled and all available money is being utilized.

Friends of the Homes in Western North Carolina, have responded generously to the Founders and Builders Program to raise funds with which to establish the Broyhill Home to serve the children of Western North Carolina. With the support and cooperation of Baptists and other friends of the Homes, another ministry is being developed in Ashville. A Home in which to serve unwed mothers and their offspring will be opened during the fall of 1969.

By the use of designated gifts and bequests from individuals and families, significant progress is being made in the long-range plans for upgrading of facilities. Two cottages are now under construction at Mills Home. A recreation building and an infirmary at Kennedy Home and two cottages for children at the Broyhill Home are scheduled for construction during the next year.

The contribution of our Baptist people through the Cooperative Program, the Thanksgiving Offering, and special gifts are essential to our continued

operation and are received with deep appreciation. An increasing number of friends are finding a rewarding stewardship opportunity through the establishment of trusts for the Homes and by means of wills and estate planning for the needs of dependent children. Members of the staff are available for consultation in the estate planning and the preparation of wills.

BAPTIST HOMES OF THE AGING

Never before have your Baptist Homes of the Aging been more conscious of the Lord's Presence and of His Goodness than during the past year. He has rewarded our faith and moved upon our Baptist people to see the urgency of our needs and we are grateful. Ours shall continue to be a relationship of trust in the Lord and faith in our Baptist people. We ernestly hope that a continued and sustained effort will be made by our churches to increase and strengthen the amount of the two main means of support to our ministry to the Aging. . . the Special Offering and the Cooperative Program. Through these two sources, one-third of the total income for the Homes is derived, and 85% of the residents, who are financially dependent, are cared for and supplemented.

Since last year, the Yancyville Home, our newest Home, has been filled to capacity, and we now have almost 200 deserving older men and women living in our midst there and in our other four Homes. . . Resthaven and Hayes Home, in Winston-Salem; the Albermarle Home, in Albermarle; and the Hamilton Home, in Hamilton. These wonderful people are finding much happiness in Christian compaionship with persons of their age group, and great security in knowing that they will be loved and cared for in sickness as well as in health. We believe that our Baptist people will want to have an ever-increasing part in so worthy a labor of love in the Master's Name. We know that the Lord will not fail us, and we also believe that our people will want to be as faithful as possible.

FOUNDATION

The assets of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., have now reached beyond the one million dollar mark, including trust funds and real estate. This is an indication that Baptists of North Carolina have discovered that the Foundation is a real service arm of the Baptist Convention of North Carolina.

The Foundation has put particular interest in the making of wills. Several churches have used the facilities of the Foundation to conduct WILL CLINICS and reports indicate they were successful. We have had the opportunity to counsel with many people concerning their own wills, and in some instances we have provided the information and direction necessary for inclusion of Baptist causes in their wills.

We request your prayer support for this ministry.

INTERRACIAL COOPERATION

Baptists in the two state conventions have strengthened some established work during 1968-69 while opening new avenues of service together.

Members of the General Baptist State Convention have shared in the annual state-wide Vacation Bible School Clinic at Wingate College in January; in the Conference on Evangelism; Men's and Boys' Conferences on Human Relationships were held in five places throughout the State. This department has utilized the Negro talent in the Baptist Youth Conference at Lumberton. Rev. and Mrs. C. R. Edwards, of Fayettville, served as the first Negro conference leaders at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly during World Mission Week in June at Southport.

Various churches and Associations have encouraged the program of work with the National Baptists at local levels. Successful biracial revivals were planned and held in the Robeson and Anson Associations. Several associations invited Negro speakers to participate in their annual meetings, and a growing number of white pastors and congregations are seeking ways of dialogue with Negro congregations.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

The Division of Christian Higher Education of the Baptist State Convention functions chiefly through the Council made up of eighteen members of the Education Committee of the General Board, seven college presidents, seven chairmen of boards of trustees, and seven academic deans.

North Carolina Baptists now have a university, four senior colleges and two junior colleges, with an enrollment of approximately 12,000 students. There are more than 500 young men and women preparing for full-time Christian services. These Christian colleges operate on the basic assumption that apart from religious commitment life can have no ultimate meaning. Jesus Christ is the foundation of all truth and provides the frame of reference in which all knowledge can be examined and used for the good of man and for the glory of God and the two cannot be separated.

All colleges have regular scheduled chapel services which provide an opportunity for worship, meditation, scripture, prayer, music, and preaching. Baptist colleges are not only concerned with the special role of training the Christian vocational worker, but they are also concerned with teaching and training churchmen who will take Christian views and

sympathies into any vocation which they enter.

The Cooperative Program is the life-line of Baptist colleges and the Administration, faculties, students, trustees and alumni are deeply grateful of North Carolina Baptists for this support.



PLEASE NOTE: To an c ersight on the part of the Associational Clerk and those helping in the preparation of the 1968-69 Minutes, the following item should have been included on page 12:

* The \$4,600.00 for the Missionary's salary, as proposed in the 1969-70 Budget, is not a cut in salary from last year's budget. In the past, the State Baptist Convention of North Carolina has been paying Mr. Ray \$900.00 a year for his ministry as chaplain at the Cameron Morrison School at Hoffman, North Carolina, and this \$900.00 has been included in his annual salary up to now. According to the department of Missions, beginning January 1, 1970, this remuneration will no longer go through the Sandhills Baptist Association Treasurer, therefore we cannot include it in the Proposed Budget as before.

Constitution and By-Laws

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the Sandhills Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Missionary

Baptist Churches within the area served by the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to the Committee on Reception of Churches, which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith and practice. Upon a vote of the Association, the church shall be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

The application of an established Missionary Baptist Church, cooperative member of an adjacent Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, shall upon recommendation of that Association, upon favorable recommendation of our Committee on Reception of Churches, and upon favorable vote of this Association, be admitted as a member and received into full fellowship of this Association immediately.

Churches making application for membership into this Association between annual meetings may be voted on and admitted to full membership by a majority vote of the Executive Committee after investigation, approval and recommendation of the Committee on Reception of Churches.

Section 3. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from

any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

Section 4. Any church may withdraw from this Association at its pleasure.

ARTICLE III. MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) the members of all standing committees of the Association. The aforesaid officers, pastors and standing committee members shall constitute ex-officio messengers at large of the Association and exercise all rights and privileges of duly elected messengers. (4) Three messengers from each cooperating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each fifty members or major fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to elect more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger or messenger at large who is not a member of a church which is a cooperating member of the Association. Messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A cooperating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

B. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the officers, pastors, members of standing committees, as messengers at large of the Association, and the duly elected messengers or their alternates present.

Section 3. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power to infringe on any of the internal rights of the individual churches. It may advise with the member churches and recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance and may claim for its objects and programs the highest consideration.

ARTICLE V. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers. The Officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian and three Trustees. The officers shall be elected at the annual meetings and installed during the afternoon session of the second day. They shall assume their duties immediately after installation and continue in office until their successors are installed. The moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one year terms in succession.

Section 2. Departments. The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Baptist Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, and the Department of Church Music. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary to the Association. The Department heads shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Committees. There shall be the following standing committees (1) Committee on Committees; (2) Committee on Constitution and By-Laws; (3) Executive Committee; (4) Nominating Committee; (5) Committee on Ordinations; (6) Committee on Place and Preacher; (7) Program Committee; (8) Promotion Committee; (9) Committee on Reception of Churches; (10) Committee on Resolutions; (11) Finance and Audit Committee.

Section 4. Employees. The Missionary and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole Program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction and be subject to the authority of the Executive Committee. They shall be nominated by the Promotion Committee and elected by the Executive Committee or the Association, in Annual Session.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of twothirds of the messengers present provided that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following By-Laws.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Moderator shall preside over the sessions of the Association and see that order and decorum are observed by everyone present. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms. He shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the association.

Section 2. The Vice Moderator shall preside at the pleasure of the

moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Clerk-Treasurer

(1) To keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(2) To superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes.

(3) To keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents

belonging to the Association.

(4) To receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed directly to the Association. Disbursement shall be made in accordance with the budget adopted by the Association. Non-budgeted items must be approved by the Executive Committee.

(5) To make an annual report concerning such to the Association.

For his services he shall be paid annually an amount recommended by

the Finance Committee and approved by the Association.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts of particular interest about each of the member Churches and report at the annual session of the Association.

Section 5. The Trustees shall hold title to all property of the Association. When authorized by the Executive Committee of the Association, they shall execute notes secured by mortgages and deeds of trust in the purchase of church sites or other property. The Trustees in all acts with respects to property purchased shall be controlled and directed by the Association through its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II. COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Committee on Committees, consisting of five members, shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee on Committees shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 2. The Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, consisting of four members shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Missionary, and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on

Committees and elected by the Association.

This Committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws as may be necessary to better

serve the purposes of the Association.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall be composed of (1) the active pastors of member churches; (2) the officers of the Association; (3) the chairman of each standing committee of the Association as ex-officio members at large representing the Association on this committee; and (4) two members elected by each church and (5) the President, Vice President and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council. This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but

such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the event that regular members cannot attend Executive Committee meetings. This Committee shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee, consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations for each office of the Association to the

annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. The Committee on Ordination, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all Pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations, as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 6. The Committee on Place and Preacher, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of meeting and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 7. The Program Committee, which shall consist of three members shall plan well in advance the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers

and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 8. The Promotion Committee shall consist of the following officers: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Heads of the various departments-Sunday School, Church Training, Music, Baptist Men, Womans Missionary Union-Stewardship and Promotion, Evangelism, Library Representative, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative and Associational Youth Council President. The Vice Moderator shall serve as Chairman of the Promotion Committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Missionary, to devise ways and means, recommended measures and initiate action, implementing promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association. It shall receive and disburse all Mission Club Funds. This committee shall at the Executive Meetings, bring regular reports regarding receipts, disbursements, progress made, and future plans for our Associational Missions Program.

Section 9. The Committee on Reception of Churches, composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrines, practices, and co-operation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement of its findings along with its recommendations shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Executive Committee as provided herein in Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution.

Section 10. The Committee on Resolutions, consisting of three members shall draw-up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

Section 11. The Finance and Auditing Committee shall be composed of seven (7) members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six (6) different churches of the Association chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented more than two (2) consecutive years. No more than four (4) members of this Committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw-up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Executive Committee for their approval prior to its presentation at the Annual Associational Meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other iniscellaneous financial matters. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make proper annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE III. PROCEDURE

All business shall be conducted and all discussions shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

PROCEEDINGS

of the TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL SESSION of the SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Thursday Evening, October 15, 1970 EPHESUS BAPTIST CHURCH

The Twenty-first Annual Session of the Sandhills Baptist Association was called to order by Joe Lennon, Moderator, at the Ephesus Baptist Church, October 15, 1970. Tony Denton led the group in singing the hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name".

Henry Reynolds, President of the Associational Youth Council, led in

orayer.

Joe Lennon welcomed the Messengers and visitors.

Mike Ray, the Associational Missionary, introduced four new pastors and their wives: Rev. & Mrs. Melvin Helms, Re. & Mrs. Foley Gales, Rev. & Mrs. Larry McCoy, and Rev. George Jeffreys. Rev. Carlisle Franks and Rev. Coy Frye were recognized as interim pastors of the Aberdeen Baptist Church and the Taylor Memorial Baptist Church respectively.

A motion was made that the messengers now registered and those to register constitute this session of the Association and that the printed program be adopted as the order of business. The motion was carried.

Tony Denton led the congregation in singing the hymn, "I Love to Tell

The Story".

Portia Marsh, Vice-president of the Associational Youth Council, read the scripture passage, II Corinthians, 5:1-14.

Robert Denton, pastor of the Ashley Heights Baptist Church, brought

an inspiring message on Missions.

Gene Booker, Vice Moderator, read the Constitutional changes for the first time:

FIRST

That Section 3 of ARTICLE II of the By-Laws be amended by adding thereto: "The President, Vice-President and Secretary to the Associational Youth Council" as number (5).

SECOND

That Section 8 of ARTICLE II of the By-Laws be amended as follows: "The Promotion Committee shall consist of the following officers: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Heads of the various departments-Sunday School, Church Training, Music, Baptist Men, Woman's Missionary Union, Stewardship and Promotions, Evangelism, Library Representative, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative and Associational Youth Council President. The Vice Moderator shall serve as Chairman of the Promotion Committee,"

Miscellaneous business consisted of a motion presented by Joe Babb on behalf of the Cameron Baptist Church as follows:

"That all action (reports, resolutions, etc. requiring Associational approval by vote) be printed in the published minutes of the Association without alterations or abridgement."

The motion was seconded by Don Swinney and carried by the group. Curtis Bettini read the Report of the Nominating Committee and it was adopted as read. The report of the Committee on Committee was presented by Max Gilmor and was adopted by the group.

Dewitt Purvis, Associational Treasurer, gave the Treasurer's Report

and this was adopted as read. (Report to be found on page .)

Ray Benfield presented the Report of the Finance and Audit Committee and this was adopted with the ammendment that 1969-70 budget would be listed alongside the 1970-71 budget. The motions were carried as adopted. (Report found on page).

Tony Denton led the group in singing, "Praise Him, Praise Him".

Special music was furnished by the Youth Choir of the Carthage Baptist Church.

Joe Babb, pastor of the Cameron Baptist Church, read scripture (Matthew 7:24-29) and led in prayer.

Max Gilmore, pastor of the Beulah Hill and Pleasant Hill Baptist Churches, delivered the Annual Sermon. His topic was "The Church".

Fulton Thomas, pastor of the host church, pronounced the closing prayer

Miss Pam Hendricks, a student of Meredith College and former member of the Sandhills Baptist Youth Council, gave an interesting and inspiring talk about the religious programs at Meredith.

Don Swinney, pastor of the Red Branch Baptist Church, conducted the

Memorial Service and read the names of our "Beloved Dead".

Mrs. Rowland Johnson, Music Director of the Robbins Baptist Church, sang a special musical selection.

Ray Benfield, pastor of the Carthage Baptist Church, read the Scripture

I Corinthians 4:1-2) and delivered the message on "Stewardship".

REPORTS

MISSIONARY'S REPORT 1969-70

Preparation and training will have to be the key words for 1969-70. We were fortunate to have a full slate of leaders at the Wingate State-wide Vacation Bible School Clinic...Gene Tuten, Association V.B.S. Director, Ray Benfield, Mrs. Ray Benfield, Mrs. G. P. Jones, Mrs. Robert Bowlin, and Mike Ray. In March we had our own Associational Vacation Bible School Clinic with a very good representation from the majority of the churches.

The later part of January Mrs. G. P. Jones (W.M.U.), Gene Booker (Baptist Men), Robert Denton (Sunday School), Wayne Adams (Church Training), and your missionary attended the Shaping of the 70's Conference in Greensboro for training and on February 16 the Sandhills Baptist Associational Shaping of the 70's Clinic was held in Carthage. Those churches sending representatives were helped greatly ... those who had no representatives were contacted and offered help. Throughout the spring and summer Robert Denton, Ray Benfield, Gene Booker and Don Swinney visited in churches to explain the new grading system and new literature.

An Associational Music Workshop was held in Carthage September 15, 16, and 17 with good attendance from many churches. Mr. Charles Gatwood from the State Baptist Convention, Mr. Charles Storey of Winston-Salem, and Mrs. Edmond Geer of Aberdeen First Baptist Church were leaders for this workshop. The workshop was not only helpful to many people attending for the three nights but inspired several people to attend the Church

Music Course at the Sandhills Community College.

On September 21,22 and 24 an Associational Leadership Workshop was held with about 90 people taking advantage of training. Three books were used for each age group... Understanding, Guiding and Sunday School Work... with the pre-schoolers, children, youth and adults. We trust these books can be offered at a later date for others who did not attend to take and a review for those who attended.

The Associational Woman's Missionary Union has been extremely busy in training church leaders this past year. Not only have they had special training sessions for church W.M.U. Leaders but have visited several

The Associational Baptist Men have held two Retreats...once at the Cameron Baptist Church with Mr. Henry Parker, Director of the Cameron

Morrison School, the principal speaker and another Retreat with both boys

and men participating.

They also voted to recommend to you that the Promotional Committee be enlarged to include more areas of work and to be more helpful in promoting our programs.

If we reach people with the good news of salvation, we must have hearts of concern...concern that souls are loved, concern that souls go not to hell, concern that souls are told of God's love, mercy, forgiveness, eternal salvation in the Lord Jesus Christ.

We need a personal commitment to the Holy Spirit in this God-given task. Someone has said, "Every saved soul this side of heaven ought to be concerned about every lost soul this side of hell" will be, if we are committed to this glorious task.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Our Baptist Hospital continues to grow, in spite of its serious problems. Physical growth is the result of the long-range development program which has already seen the completion of the new power plant, the School of Nursing and the Allied Health Building, and the additions to the Medical School. Construction on the new patient tower is progressing, after some delays, and is expected to be completed by mid - 1972.

There is continued growth in the quality of patient care provided. There is improved equipment in the heart diagnostic center in the fight against heart disease; the department of nuclear medicine continues to make progress in the diagnosis and treatment of some of our most dreaded diseases; the stroke center renders valuable service in the study and treatment of strokes and brain tumors.

Changes in admission procedures have been made necessary by the financial crisis the hospital faces. When a doctor reserves a bed for a

patient the admission office contacts the patient to obtain the needed information, including the type and amount of his hospital insurance coverage. After estimating the hospital bill and determining the amount of insurance coverage, the patient is notified of the difference which he is expected to bring when he enters the hospital. An effort is made to counsel with all patients who need financial aid and assist them in getting help.

With all the growth, one thing remains unchanged: the desire and determination to care for the needy sick. This has been at the heart of the hospital's ministry since it opened in 1923. Last year it ministered to 5,225 Service Patients for 47,499 days of hospital care, in addition to the large number served in the Out-patient Clinics. The free care amounted to more than a million dollars beyond what these patients, their insurance, and all sponsoring agencies paid. North Carolina Baptist provided \$565,000 of this amount - \$237,000 through the Cooperative Program and \$328,000 through the Mothers Day Offering. To date this year 21 churches in our Association contributed \$2,444.27 of the Mothers Day Fund, thus helping the hospital keep faith with its purpose.

FOUNDATION

The fact that the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. has tripled its assets during the past eight years is proof that this service arm of the Convention has found favor with North Carolina Baptist.

Since the Foundation was reactivated in 1966, assets have increased from \$350,000 to more than a million dollars. This includes trust funds

and real estate.

THE FOUNDATION advances the Kingdom of God in two major ways: by serving individuals and by serving Baptist agencies and institutions. This includes the Cooperative, Missions, Higher Education, the Baptist Hospital, and Baptist Homes for the Aging.

SPECIAL EMPHASIS ON TRUSTS AND WILLS

The Foundation has again this year put a major interest on the making of wills.

Many churches have used the facilities of the Foundation to conduct Will Clinics, and reports from these Clinics indicate that they have been very successful.

THE FOUNDATION also has an opportunity to counsel with many people concerning their own wills, and in some instances has provided the information and direction necessary for inclusion of Baptist causes in their will.

THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION has had a most successful year, is on the move, and is rendering service to individual Baptists in a concrete way.

Your church would not think of trying to carry out its mission without literature devoted to the Sunday School, Church Training, W.M.U., Brotherhood and all other church organizations. The Recorder is just as important and should be in the budget just as this literature is. The cost is only 4¢ a week, a penny less than a post card. Your church is the loser by not taking this step. Won't you do it this coming year?

N. C. BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

God has blessed our Homes for the Aging through all of our nineteen years, and during the past year in a special way. We acknowledge His goodness and thank Him for every manifestation of His Love. We also want to express sincere gratitude to our Baptist people for their increased love and concern for the 195 dear elderly people to whom we are ministering in our five Baptist Homes - Resthaven, The Hayes Home, and Nursing Care Unit, in Winston-Salem; the Albemarle Home, in Albemarle; the Hamilton Home, in Hamilton; and the Yanceyville Home, in Yancyville.

An urgent appeal was made to our Baptist people before our offering in February to help us reduce the alarming deficit in the operation of the Homes. This plea was heard, and the offering, of \$168,349.34, from July 1, 1969 through June 30, 1970 from our Baptist Churches, has exceeded all other offerings in previous years. How grateful we are for this increase. We want to urge our people, however, to continue giving liberally to our Homes and to remember that we are still confronted with staggering cost of living and the great need to strengthen the total economy of the Homes as we try to move forward in developing and expanding this vital ministry.

Of great interest in our Development Program is the proposed new addition to our present Nursing Care Unit. Judge and Mrs. William York, of Greensboro, have offered a gift of \$80,000.00 to the Homes for this purpose, providing the Homes can raise an additional \$80,000.00. If this proposal is fulfilled, 10 to 12 additional rooms would be made available, with accommodations for 20 to 24 people, and bringing our total nursing care capacity to 80 beds. We appeal to Baptist people to pray for the success of this very special project in the care of our elderly sick.

There is no greater security for an older person than that of the Christian nurture and love offered in our Baptist Homes, and we thank the Lord, and our Baptist people, for this ministry. We shall continue to look to Him, and to our people, on behalf of these to whom Christian love means so much, in faith that our needs will be supplied.

Do you need help with Annuity and Insurance for your pastor and/or other staff personnel, Weekend Stewardship Revivals, Growth in Christian Stewardship Program, The Forward Program, Study and Preaching Program, Tithers Enrollment Week, Planning a Budget, Youth in Stewardship Program, Family Stewardship Program, Visual Aids, Communications, Developing a Special Stewardship Program, Principles of Family or Church Budgetting, Setting up Better Financial Record Keeping for your Church, or leaflets and other information on the Cooperative Program, State Missions, and Family or Church Finance?
