

### Constitution

of

#### THE SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

#### ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be THE SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

#### ARTICLE II-PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to cooperate with other Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

#### **ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS**

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are

members of, and duly elected by, affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions; and other full-time paid

professional staff;

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairmen of all standing committees and the Superintendent of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations

(1)The Churches affiliated with this Association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person upon his profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this, and in other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under the watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the

Credentials Committee.

(3) Baptist Churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist Associations may become affiliated with this Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee, and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.

(4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The Association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall

recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2 - (1) of this Article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is no effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballot, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision, to notify the Association in writing, of this intention.

#### **ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS**

Secction 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the

second Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the Associational Board is empowered to change the time or place of Meeting, cancel the Annual Meeting, or call a Special Meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members present when the vote is taken, and giving two week's notice, if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected

officers and messengers as set forth in ARTICLE III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

#### ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, three (3) Trustees, and

Superintendent of Missions.

Section 2. Departments: The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Church Training Department, the Youth Department, the Brotherhood Department, the Music Department, the Evangelism Department, the Stewardship Promotions Department, the Library Services Department and the Woman's Missionary Union Department.

The Department Directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational

Section 3. Associational Board

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees: (1) Executive Committee; (2) Committee on Committees; (3) Nominating Committee; (4) Finance and Audit Committee; (5) Program Committee; (6) Committee on Constitution and By-Laws; (7) Credential Committee; (8) Committee on Ordinations; (9) Committee on Place and Preacher; (10) Committee on Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Superintendent of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction of, and be subject to the authority of the Associational Board and be elected by the

Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

#### **ARTICLE VI - REVISION**

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present, at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session, to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist Bulletin in the last issue before the Annual Meeting.

#### ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following By-Laws.

### **By-Laws**

#### **ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES**

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its By-Laws.

#### ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Moderator shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board and see that order and decorum are observed at all times. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms at a time. He shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator, and shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. The Clerk shall:

(1) Keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(2) Superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational Minutes.

- (3) Keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
- (4) For his services, he shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall:

(1) Be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all moneys.

(2) Keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.(3) Provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational News

Bulletin, bi-monthly.

(4) Make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. The Historian shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper

parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. The Trustees shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association, or Associational Board.

Section 8. The Superintendent of Missions:

a. He shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the Missionary or the Association with a 30-days notice.

b. He shall have 3 weeks vacation with pay, the time to be determined in

consultation with the Executive Committee.

- c. He may be away from the Association for 3 weeks for revivals and/or schools of missions. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- d. He will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they conflict with his basic responsibility.
- e. He may serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed 5 Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time the church should contribute to the Associational treasury a reasonable remuneration for his services.
- f. He may serve as Chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with his responsibilities to the Association.

(2) Duties

- a. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of Missions to respond within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- b. He shall give general oversight to the work of the Association and he, with his assistance of the Executive Committee, shaw draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associatonal Board.

c. He shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board, and an

annual report to the Association.

d. He shall publish an attractive, and informative Newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board Board members, Associational officers and general church officers.

e. He shall cultivate the friendship and good will of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us

in carrying out the Great Commission.

- f. He shall be alert to the needs for mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local, affiliated church.
- g. He shall be an ex-officio memer of all standing committees of the Association.

#### ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School Director

(1) The Sunday School Director shall study and seek to promote Sunday School,

Vacation Bible School and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.

(2) He shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board, and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training Director

- (1) The Church Training Director shall study and seek to promote the Training Union work in the churches of the Association.
  - (2) He shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.
- (3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth Director

(1) The Youth Director shall seek to promote youth work in the churches of the Association through Council meetings, rallies and retreats.

(2) He shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood Director

(1) The Brotherhood Director shall promote the total Brotherhood program, (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats and rallies.

(2) He shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the

support of the total program of the local church.

(3) He shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(4) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music Director

(1) The Music Director shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.

(2) He shall plan with the proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.

- (3) He shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (4) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism Director

(1) The Evangelism Director shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay-evangelism schools, retreats and rallies.

(2) He shall appoint a Committee to assist in this work.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotions Director

(1) The Stewardship Promotions Director shall encourage Christian stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics and stewardship revivals.

(2) He shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services Director

(1) The Library Services Director shall promote library services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, Audio-visual aid materials and equipment.

(2) He shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of

the Association.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union Director

(1) The W.M.U. Director shall promote the total W.M.U. Program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action and Mission Friends) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(2) She shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and

girls in the support of the total program of the church.

(3) She shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(4) She shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board, and an annual report to the Association.

### ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD shall be composed of (1) the active pastors of member churches and missions; (2) the officers of the Association; (3) the chairman of each standing committee of the Association; and (4) two members elected by each church and (5) the President, Vice-President and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council. This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Superintendent of Missions, Directors of the various Departments, Associational W.M.U. Director, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board representative, and the President of the Associational Youth Council. The Vice-Moderator shall seve as Chairman of this Committee. It shall be the duty of this Committee, cooperating with the Superintendent of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action, implementing promotion and

missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association.

Section 3. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES consisting of five members shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no

member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. THE NOMINATION COMMITTEE, consisting of five members shall present a list of nominations for each office, departmental director of the association, and State Baptist Convention. Agencies Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder, (6) Baptist Foundation, to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. THE FINANCE AND AUDIT COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different

churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to its presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at its annual meeting.

Section 6. THE PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall consist of three members and shall plan well in advance the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual

meeting.

Section 7. THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS, consisting of four members shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Superintendent of Missions, and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This Committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws as may be necessary to better serve the purposes of

the Association.

Section 8. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement of its findings along with its recommendation shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III Section 2 of the Constitution. This Committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2(5) of the Constitution.

Section 9. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper

services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. THE COMMITTEE ON PLACE AND PREACHER, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of

the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS, consisting of three members, shall draw-up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

#### ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BY-LAWS

The Association may amend or alter the By-Laws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present, at the annual meeting provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist Bulletin in the last issue before the Annual Session.

#### ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

Southern Baptist churches depend on the Annuity Board to provide retirement and insurance protection to pastors and others in church-related vocations.

The Board holds in trust retirement contributions from nearly 40,000 persons. Their

contributions will be converted into annuity benefits when they retire.

These contributions, taken together, are considered as funds held in trust by the Annuity Board. They now amount to \$401,135,261. While this appears to be a great deal of money, this must be divided among the 40,000 future annuitants and serve their lifetime, post-retirement needs.

Darold H. Morgan, president of the Board, described 1975 as "an excellent year of recovery, growth, and optimism" for the agency. Income from the investment of funds

held in trust attained a one-year record of \$23,149,064.

Benefits paid to retirees, widows, and the disabled in 1975 amounted to \$15,734,003. During the Annuity Board's 58 years of existence, it has paid more than \$141 million in retirement and protection benefits.

A 13th Check issued in December, 1975 provided 8,221 annuitants with an extra month's income to help them combat the rapidly rising cost of living. The combined amount of this extra benefit came to \$733,585. It is called the 13th Check because it is over and above the 12 regular monthly payments.

The Annuity Board helps churches and SBC agencies get the best coverage at the

most advantageous rates in life, health, and disability insurance.

In North Carolina 2,667 staff members of 2,140 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program-2,421 in the Family Benefit Section (Plan A), 1,069 in the Age Security section (Plan B), and 240 in the Variable Benefit sections (Plan C).




Just as in Old Testament days, communication still remains one of the most sensitive problems in our churches. Think for a moment -- how many problems has you church had that could be traced to a lack of communication? Too many church members are misled because they are uninformed, poorly informed, or misinformed. Churches must take initiative to provide accurate information if work in the local church, association, and convention continue to show progress.

Each year more churches understand the importance of providing the RECORDER for each family. When this is done, members become more responsive because they are better informed. Baptists have made encouraging progress in recent years through

bold mission enterprises and this can be traced to better-informed church members. Stewardship gains also go hand in hand with better communications. As an example, 79 or the 80 churches which led their associations in per capita mission gifts last year have a RECORDER club.

Each church needs to look at its budget carefully and then make provision to send the RECORDER to each family. Although nearly 1,100 churches in the state have the RECORDER in the budget, at least 500 more churches should take this step. Such action could be the difference between mediocrity and greatness in your church.

#### NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

Your North Carolina Baptist Homes have, in the past year, completed 25 years of growth and development. These have been good years, filled with the abundant blessings and goodness of the Lord. He has brought us from one Home, in March of 1951, to five Homes and an excellent Nursing Facility, from one resident to 230 residents and patients. Hundreds have been ministered to during these years, many

lives have been blessed, and families have been helped immeasurably.

The past year has been of special excitement and enthusiasm as we entered into the Fund-Raising Effort to raise \$1,000,000 for the construction of the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville, In September, 1975, Brother Ralph Cannon was asked by the Trustees to serve as Director of Development and Denominational Relations and has been leading the fund raising program for the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in a remarkable way. He reports that the response has been good and that we will reach the goal.

When completed, the Western North Carolina Home, in Asheville, will accomodate 50 people, and will bring the total capacity of our Baptist Homes and the Nursing Care Unit to 280. We now operate five other Homes, and a Nursing Care Unit-Resthaven, the Hayes Home, the Nursing Care Unit, in Winston-Salem; the Albermarle Home, in Albermarle: the Hamilton Home, in Hamilton, N.C. the Yanceyville home, in

Yancevville.

In these Homes the best of care is given, the compassion and love of Christ shared and underscored. The love gifts of North Carolina Baptists make this Christian care and concern possible through to very vital sources -The Cooperative Program, and the Special Offering for the Homes, received on the third Sunday of February each year. Through these sources more than 35% of the Homes' total income is provided, and the majority of the residents who cannot pay the full cost of care are supplemented. We are grateful for these life-sustaining gifts and thank every North Carolina Baptist who makes them possible! Gifts this year, through these sources, are greater than ever before, and if we are to meet the overwhelming needs of older people in our midst, we must double and triple our efforts, both in numbers ministered to, and in support of

Close at hand is another venture in the development of the Homes which we're excited-the building of apartments on the site of the Hays Homes property in Winston-Salem. The first of these units is to be completed by the fall of 1977. Those interested in this place of the ministry of Baptist Homes may contact Bill Poole, the Executive Director, of the Homes for information.

Great things are in store for us in our Homes for the Aging as we look to the future, and we covet the earnest prayer and the continual support of every North Carolina Baptist as we move ahead in this challenging ministry to older people in our midst.

#### THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COUNCIL

The emphasis of the Christian Life Council in 1976 has been twofold: citizenship and

family relationships.

In January a bicentennial packet was mailed to every North Carolina Baptist pastor. In addition, a number of sermons and conferences have dealt with Christian Citizenship. Six tracts on citizenship were written and printed and are available for local church use.

A major concern for the Christian home has prompted the Council to distribute over 150,000 pieces of literature relative to the family. Over a hundred sermons on the

home were preached and a number of conferences were conducted.

A Workshop for Youth Ministers was co-sponsored with the Youth Ministries Section.

A single Adult Conference is scheduled for October 29-31 in Charlotte.

One of the most exciting developments is the creation of the Department of Christian Family Life. W. Douglas Cole will head this Department which will be a part of the Christian Life Council.

The Council continues to serve as a research, resource and referral agency for North Carolina Baptists regarding applied Christianity. Dozens of requests are received and answered from Baptists pertaining to every day life situations.

The Christian Life Council's reason for existence centers on the concept of helping

those who call Him "Lord, Lord" to know and do His commandments.

#### NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATION

"Christian stewardship" is a phrase frequently heard in staff meetings at Baptist Hospital. The hospital's leadership holds to a philosophy of administration based on stewardship and tries to pass this on to all employees. A continuing effort is made to help each employee, whatever his particular job, to realize that he is part of a team involved in a Christian ministry of healing. The difference this makes in the whole

atmosphere of the hospital is evident to patients and visitors.

This sense of stewardship demands a continual updating and upgrading of medical procedures to assure patients the highest quality care. One of the most significant recent developments is the creation of a department of Family Medicine. This department provides primary health care for a limited number of families, that is, the kind of all-round, ongoing health care normally provided by a family physician. At the same time the department offers training in family medicine for physicians who will enter this field of practice. This will help to balance the trend of recent years toward increased specialization in the practice of medicine.

Many of the physicians training in family medicine are receiving part of their clinical experience in small towns and rural communities under the auspices of the Area Health Education Center (AHEC), created by the State legislature. It is believed and hoped that some of them will choose to remain in these areas for their permanent

practice

Improvement of physical facilities is another expression of the hospital's sense of stewardship. In recent months renovation of the west and south wings of the hospital has been completed; construction has been completed on an addition to the water-chilling facilities; construction has begun on a new building to house the new department of Family Medicine.

The Pastoral Care Department continues to make its contributions toward the

fulfillment of our stewardship. A chaplain is assigned to each area of the hospital and is responsible for providing a pastoral ministry to patients, staff and visitors in that area. There are capacity enrollments in all phases of the Clinical Pastoral Education programs. A third satellite has opened in Morganton during the past year.

Mother's Day gifts for the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$405,946.52, compared to

a total of \$390,000 for the preceding fiscal year.

Preschool care and education are offered a select group of younger children. Consultation in child development and family life education is offered to churches concerned for families and children in their communities. Varied planning and counseling services are offered to families in stress.

In each of these services, the focus is on the whole family; the motivation is

Christian love; the aim is wholeness and health for the persons served.

To make these varied services available to families and children, a statewide network of facilities and programs has emerged. Indian Beach, Kinston, Pembroke, Fayetteville, Raleigh, Burlington, Wallburg, Thomasville, Charlotte, Forest City, Asheville, Waynesville --- each site is a base of operations from which families in need can secure assistance. Furthermore, the staff is prepared to call on the additional resources of religious, educational, medical, psychological, recreational, and social service personel in the communities to help persons grow to their full potential.

No greater investment can be made in the future of God's Kingdom or in the future of America than to invest in children. Your support of missions through the Cooperative Program is the lifeline of the Baptist Children's Homes. Your special gift at Thanksgiving further guarantees the continuance of Christian child care. The staff and children of the Baptist Children's Home pledge ourselves to make the most of the

#### CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

A careful reading of North Carolina Baptist history reveals that the Baptist State Convention was organized primarily for the purpose of establishing a Baptist college.

When the Convention was formed in 1830, there were two church academies already in existence, as well as the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. However, Baptists wanted their own school. Wake Forest Institute was begun in 1834. Five years later the Institute became Wake Forest College. Thus, Baptists in this state have been

closely identified with Christian higher education 142 years.

Today, The Christian higher education system of Baptists embraces six other colleges in addition to Wake Forest: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith and Wingate. Since 1944, these schools have been guided in their development by the Council on Christian Higher Education of the Baptist State Convention. The Council is the only organization of its kind in the Southern Baptist Convention, and is one of the oldest educational cooperatives in America.

It is not enough that North Carolina Baptists have begun and now support six colleges and one university. As important as history and tradition are, they cannot substitute for warm, vital relationships in the present. The need for colleges and churches to give fresh attention to their partnership and their mutual dependence is always present. Listed below are some of the ways this partnership finds tangible

expression year after year:

1. North Carolina Baptist continue to support their colleges through the Cooperative

Program and the Baptist College Day offering on Father's Day.

2. The colleges continue to provide training for most of the pastors and other church staff persons who lead North Carolina Baptist churches.

3. Pastors have helped the colleges in their efforts to recruit Baptist young people by furnishing the names of high school students for contact by the colleges.

4. The colleges pledge to North Carolina Baptist youth that financial aid is available to assist them in attending a Baptist college. No qualified student is turned away for financial reasons. Grants, loans and work scholarships are available.

5. Churches, pastors' conferences and associations invite the colleges to send

students and faculty to speak and lead programs.

Baptist colleges are anxious to receive invitations to serve the churches and associations. Each of the colleges is prepared to send speakers upon request.

In a secular world with its materialistic priorities, Baptist colleges are committed to the guidance of Christian values in the search for truth. Believing that God is the source of all knowledge and wisdom, Baptist colleges can urge students to search for truth in all areas of knowledge without fear.

Baptist colleges reaffirm their gratitude for the support given by Baptists through the Cooperative Program. We further reaffirm our faith in our support of the local

church, and the broad programs of our denomination.

#### THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

In a tract that came across the Foundation desk during the past year was a note about the will of the famous financier J. Pierpoint Morgan. It is reported to have contained 10,000 words and incorporated 37 different articles of instruction, all of which were necessary because a vast fortune has to be properly dispersed. What Morgan valued most, however, was indicated by the opening statement of that legal document. It reads, "I commit my soul to the hands of my Savior, full of confidence that, having redeemed it and washed it with His most precious blood, He will present it faultless before the throne of my Heavenly Father. I entreat my children to defend, at all hazard...the blessed doctrine of complete atonement for sin through the blood of

Jesus Christ once offered, and through that alone."

What a testimony! This wealthy man recognized that of everything he owned, his most valued "possession" was the priceless gift of salvation. Paul, in II Corinthians 12:4, says "I seek not yours but you." As we think of Christian stewardship, we are accustomed to thinking first about giving or raising money. Christian stewardship is not primarily a means for raising money, but a plan for making the right kind of men.

During the 1975-1976 fiscal year, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation has continued to be used as a channel for Baptists of our state to provide a tangible support for missions in a perpetual way for the years to come. Through a will of a person who had received financial assistance years ago from our Baptist Hospital, a \$29,950 trust was established with the Baptist Foundation to provide income for the hospital's needy patients. The income of the investment for one year will repay what the hospital provided in financial assistance to this person.

New additions during the 1975-1976 year to the North Carolina Baptist Foundation assets held for our institutions and missions totaled \$210,147.17. This amount combined with the market value of real estate (including the Yanceyville unit of the N.C. Baptist Homes, Inc.) annuity trusts, and the Foundation Common Trust Fund brings the total market value of assets, as of June 30, 1976 to \$2,946.044,49.

The income from Foundation trust funds paid to beneficiaries during 1975-1976 was \$157,069.28. In previous years the Foundation had paid to beneficiaries \$1,018,414.76.

The total paid through June 30, 1976 now has reached \$1,175,484.04.

Wills still account for a major portion of the assets of the Foundation, but presently the annuity trust accounts comprise of \$480,270.73 of the total value of the Foundation assets.

# CARTHAGE

The First Baptist Church--a beacon of truth and light in the county seat of Moore County for 118 years completed three major renovation projects during the 75-76 church year. A long-awaited roof for the Educational Building was completed; a new air conditioning system for the educational building was installed; and the inside of the sanctuary was completely repainted.

A beautiful new church sign has been installed on the church lawn. It was given to

the church by Mrs. Earl G. Barbour, Sr. In memory of her husband.

For the second consecutive summer, Carthage First employed a Summer Youth Worker. Miss Kathy Morgan was with us for ten weeks of ministry and worked with our young people. The Youth Corps Program of the Baptist State Convention is willing to explore the possibilities such a program with any Baptist Church.

In the area of Stewardship, Carthage First voted to increase by one-percent its gifts

to both the Cooperative Program and to the Sandhills Baptist Association.

Probably the most historic thing to happen, however, involved the study and adoption of a Statement of Purpose for the church along with three sections of Church objectives and Goals for the coming year. It is the first time the church has moved in a direction such as this, and the members are excited about the possibilities of setting goals. Three new committees--Congregational Care, Evangelism, and Mission and Service--were approved to see that the church approved goals are carried out.

COLONIAL HEIGHTS

The Youth have been organized, the Baptist Women organized and Home Life and also Biblical Recorder included in their church budget.

**EPHESUS** 

On Sept. 26, 1886 Ephesus Church was organized. In recognition of their 90th birthday, a brief history was given at the morning worship this Sept. the 26th. For the first time in their history they have gone full time. Rev. Edmond P. Warren, is the first full time pastor having begun his work on the field August first. Rev. Robert Wilson served for 13 months as Interim pastor. The Sunday School rooms have been painted, new pews, new stained windows and new carpet also new pulpit furniture in the sanctuary. The drives and parking area are being paved. The first Youth Revival in history of the church was held in June. Jackie Milwood, Jr. of Gardner Webb, Karen Hinton of Mars Hill and Cathi Graham of Campbell were the team and held a successful revival. # Constitution

# of THE SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I—NAME
The name of this body shall be THE SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

# ARTICLE II—PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the Gospel, and to cooperate with other Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

# ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of, and duly elected by, affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions; and other full-time paid profes-

sional staff;

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairmen of all standing committees and the Superintendent of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations

(1) The Churches affiliated with this Association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person upon his profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this, and in other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under the watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.

(3) Baptist Churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist Associations may become affiliated with this Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the re-

commendation of the Credentials Committee, and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.

(4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The Association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2—(1) of this Article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is no effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballot, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision, to notify the Association in writing, of this intention.

# ARTICLE IV—MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the Associational Board is empowered to change the time or place of Meeting, cancel the Annual Meeting, or call a Special Meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members present when the vote is taken, and giving two week's notice, if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in ARTICLE III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

### ARTICLE V—ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, three (3) Trustees, and Superintendent of Missions.

Section 2. Departments: The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: The Sunday School Department, the Church Training Department, the Youth Department, the Brotherhood Department, the Music Department, the Evangelism Department, the Stewardship Promotions Department, the Library Services Department and the Woman's Missionary Union Department.

The Department Directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees: (1) Executive Committee; (2) Committee on Committees; (3) Nominating Committee; (4) Finance and Audit Committee; (5) Program Committee; (6) Committee on Constitution and By-Laws; (7) Credential Committee; (8) Committee on Ordinations; (9) Committee on Place and Preacher; (10) Committee on Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Superintendent of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program of the Association and the Denomination. They shall work under the direction of, and be subject to the authority of the Associational Board and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

# ARTICLE VI—REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present, at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be tted in writing on the first day of the session, to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist Bulletin in the last issue before the Annual Meeting.

# ARTICLE VII—THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following By-Laws.

# **By-Laws**

# ARTICLE I—PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its By-Laws.

# ARTICLE II—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Moderator shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board and see that order and decorum are observed at all times. He shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms at a time. He shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator, and shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. The Clerk shall:

(1) Keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(2) Superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational Minutes.

(3) Keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.

(4) For his services, he shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall:

- (1) Be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all moneys.
- (2) Keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (3) Provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational News Bulletin, bimonthly.
- (4) Make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. The Historian shall collect and put in some durable form information of particu-

lar interest about each of the member churches and the Association.

Section 6. The Parliamentarian shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. The Trustees shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association, or Associational Board.

Section 8. The Superintendent of Missions:

a. He shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by

either the Missionary of the Association with a 30-days notice.

- b. He shall have 3 weeks vacation with pay, the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- c. He may be away from the Association for 3 weeks for revivals and/or schools of missions. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- d. He will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they conflict with his basic responsibility.
- e. He may serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed 5 Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time the church should contribute to the Associational treasury a reasonable remuneration for his services.
- f. He may serve as Chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with his responsibilities to the Association.

(2) Duties

- a. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of Missions to respond within the limits of his time and ability, to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- b. He shall give general oversight to the work of the Association and he, with his assistance of the Executive Committee, shall draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
- c. He shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board, and an annual report to the Association.
- d. He shall publish an attractive, and informative Newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers and general church officers.
- e. He shall cultivate the friendship and good will of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
- f. He shall be alert to the needs for mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local, affiliated church.
- g. He shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the Association.

# ARTICLE III—DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School Director

(1) The Sunday School Director shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.

(2) He shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board, and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training Director

(1) The Church Training Director shall study and seek to promote the Training Union work in the churches of the Association.

(2) He shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth Director

(1) The Youth Director shall seek to promote youth work in the churches of the Association through Council meetings, rallies and retreats.

(2) He shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood Director

(1) The Brotherhood Director shall promote the total Brotherhood program, (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats and rallies.

(2) He shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of

the total program of the local church.

(3) He shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(4) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music Director

- (1) The Music Director shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.
- (2) He shall plan with the proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.

(3) He shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.

(4) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism Director

(1) The Evangelism Director shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay-evangelism schools, retreats and rallies.

(2) He shall appoint a Committee to assist in this work.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotions Director

(1) The Stewardship Promotions Director shall encourage Christian stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics and stewardship revivals.

(2) He shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services Director

(1) The Library Services Director shall promote library services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, Audio-visual aid materials and equipment.

(2) He shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Associ-

ation.

(3) He shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report the the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union Director

(1) The W. M. U. Director shall promote the total W. M. U. Program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action and Mission Friends) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(2) She shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the

support of the total program of the church.

- (3) She shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (4) She shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board, and an annual report to the Association.

# ARTICLE IV—COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD shall be composed of (1) the active pastors of member churches and missions; (2) the officers of the Association; (3) the chairman of each

standing committee of the Association; and (4) two members elected by each church and (5) the President, Vice-President and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council. This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Superintendent of Missions, Directors of the various Departments, Associational W. M. U. Director, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board representative, and the President of the Associational Youth Council. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as Chairman of this Committee. It shall be the duty of this Committee, cooperating with the Superintendent of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action, implementing

promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association.

Section 3. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES consisting of five members shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. THE NOMINATION COMMITTEE, consisting of five members shall present a list of nominations for each office, departmental director of the association, and State Baptist Convention. Agencies Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder, (6) Baptist Foundation, to the an-

nual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. THE FINANCE AND AUDIT COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to its presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at its annual meeting.

Section 6. THE PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall consist of three members and shall plan well in advance the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared

and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS, consisting of four members shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Superintendent of Missions, and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This Committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws as may be necessary to better serve the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement of its findings along with its recommendation shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III Section 2 of the Constitution. This Committee may be called upon

by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2(5) of the Constitution.

Section 9. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. THE COMMITTEE ON PLACE AND PREACHER, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting.

Section 11. THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS, consisting of three members, shall draw-up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

# DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

The meeting got off to a good start with the devotional by Roy Little, pastor of the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church. The first session closed with a fine message by Dr. Nathan Brooks of Raleigh. At the second session in Vass Dr. Michael Blackwell, pastor of the Carthage Baptist Church, brought a fine Annual Sermon. The meeting closed with the missionary message by Dr. Charles Tabor, missionary to Korea.

As was recommended at the Annual Meeting, a World Mission Conference was requested to the State Missions Department and this request was granted for October 6-9, 1977. The Sandhills Association will be paired with the Pee Dee Baptist Association who will have their World Mission Conference October 2-5, 1977. We thank the folks of Pee Dee for allowing us to go in with them in this most important mission endeavor. (By the time you read this Report we will have had our World Mission Conference. We are grateful to the missionaries, pastors

#### STEWARDSHIP REPORT

The Stewardship Chairman was involved in planning three events for Pastors, Pastors and wives, and Pastors and church Stewardship Chairmen. In November, Dr. Bob Dale, Supervisor, Career Guidance Section, Church Administration Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board (now with Southeastern Seminary) spoke to Pastors and wives on some of the joys and pressures of Parsonage life. He also held a four-hour seminar for local pastors and "Checkpints in the Ministry," and "Support Groups for Local Pastors." Through these three events, it is hoped that everyone will see that stewardship is worldwide in its thrust. Dr. Ray showed us that stewardship is also a personal matter, and that we can be good stewards with those that God has given us in our own homes. I have enjoyed this responsibility this past year.

#### ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

In 1976, the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention recommended a new retirement program which was approved by all the state Baptist Conventions. The new program called the Southern Baptist Retirement Program will go into effect January 1, 1978.

Detailed information will be presented to churches in the early fall with a ROUTE 10 pro-

motional theme, according to Darold H. Morgan, president of the Board.

The Board paid \$17,138,343 in benefits to 11,925 widows, retired or disabled members in 1976. During its 59 years of service, the Board has paid more than \$158 million in retirement and protection benefits.

A 13th check amounting to one month's income was mailed for the eleventh time to annuitants. The combined amount of this extra benefit came to \$830,525.

Most members benefit from a decision to increase the interest rate for figuring retirement benefits. Annuitants began receiving larger checks as of January 1, 1977.

For almost 45,000 members, the Board held in trust funds totaling \$472,218,669 for retirement benefits for the year ending 1976.

The Annuity Board also administers life, medical and disability insurance programs, which reflected increases in membership.

Additional information concerning the Annuity Board and its programs of retirement and insurance may be obtained from the state convention offices or by contacting the Annuity Board, SBC, 511 North Akard Building, Dallas, TX 75201.

In North Carolina as of March 31, 1977, 2787 staff members of 2196 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program; 2491 in Family Benefit Section: 1275 in the Age Security Section and 240 in the Variable Benefit Section.

#### 1977 BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT

What is perhaps the greatest challenge faced in all the history of Southern Baptists is before our people for the remaining 23 years of the 20th century. It has been called "Bold Mission Thrust," and the success of the venture is yet to be determined. There is no doubt concerning the importance of the motivation for the undertaking, but there is certainty as to whether the motivating message will be successfully communicated to some 13 million Southern Baptists, and to our more than 34,000 churches. Without adequate communication channels, the program cannot succeed.

The heart of the program is to evangelize and congregationalize the world's population, and the thrust is confronting all human beings everywhere with the gospel, and affording them the opportunity of knowing and trusting Christ as Saviour, and then leading them to understanding of His lordship.

The program is so big, and the challenge so great, that every Baptist must be involved to make it successful. Not since Jesus presented his disciples the world has such boldness been demonstrated.

The Most difficult problems faced in our churches are related to communications. When people are uninformed, poorly informed, or misinformed, they get into trouble. When they know what is taking place in their local congregation and in the denomination, interest is generated and cooperation results. Openness is therefore important, and the purpose of the BIBLICAL RECORDER is to keep Baptist church members informed concerning involvement in their denomination, and in the Christian world.

It is important that every Baptist church member in N. C. receive the BIBLICAL RECORDER weekly. Already more than 1100 churches in our state are providing through their budgets for the RECORDER to go to all resident families.




#### BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, REPORT

CAMPUSES at Mills Home, Thomasville; Kennedy Home, Kinston; Odum Home, Pembroke; and Broyhill Home, Waynesville-Clyde continue to serve as centers of service and operation in their respective areas of the state.

FOSTER HOME CARE, a state wide program of the Homes, is vital to numbers of children

needing special help.

EMERGENCY SHELTERS at Forest City, Charlotte, Burlington and Henderson are meeting a critical need, they provide a ready resource for children who need help immediately.

THE MATERNITY HOME in Asheville, opened in 1970, has proved to be a much-needed and well-received service. More than three hundred girls have been served from throughout North Carolina and beyond.

SOCIAL WORK AND FAMILY RESOURCE CENTERS enable us to work with families in providing services to children, family rehabilitation, family education and preventive services.

THE CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER on the Mills Home Campus at Thomasville provides a demonstration program for churches who are interested in establishing services for preschool age children in nursery school education, day care and kindergarten.

Members of our staff are anxious to have you and members of your churches visit on any of

our campuses. Thank you for your dependable support in numerous ways.

#### CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

Baptists of North Carolina are deeply involved in the ministry of Christian Higher Education through the support of six colleges and one university: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wingate, and Wake Forest University. During the 1976-77 academic year, 13,733 persons were enrolled in the seven schools. The number graduating in May, 1977 was 2,493.

One strong emphasis of Baptist colleges is the preparation of pastors, missionaries and other church vocation volunteers. In the fall of 1976, there were 846 persons preparing for

church-related vocations at North Carolina Baptist Colleges.

The recruitment of more Baptist young people is a major concern of the colleges. Pastors and other church leaders are urged to encourage the youth from Baptist churches to attend a Baptist college. During 1977, the pastors have given the names of more than 6,000 prospective students of the colleges through the Council on Christian Higher Education. These students have received information from the colleges and from the Council office.

Most of the students attending a North Carolina Baptist college receive some form of financial assistance. Each of the colleges pledges to assist needy students financially in order to make available the educational experience at a Christian college. An offering is received on Father's Day each year to provide aid for North Carolina Baptist young people. Students who need to apply for financial aid should make application to college early in the junior year of high school. Grants, loans and work scholarships are available for those who need them.

North Carolina Baptist colleges continue to be grateful for generous financial support through the Cooperative Program. The colleges reaffirm their support and partnership in missions with the churches, and offer the services of faculty, students, and other campus resources to make the Bold Mission emphasis of SBC a vital and successful ministry.

#### DIVISION ON CHRISTIAN LIFE AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS REPORT

The Christian Life Council majored on two aspects in 1977—the family and legislative issues. W. Douglas Cole became director of the Christian Family Life Department January 1, 1977. Under his leadership, the Council sponsored marriage enrichment retreats, ministerwife retreats, parenting workshops, conference for engaged couples, sex-education conference and promoted the National Singles Adult Conference at Ridgecrest. In addition, many tracts on the family were printed and distributed among North Carolina Baptist.

Since the General Assembly was in session during 1977, the Council was involved on a number of issues. Some of the issues were assigned to the Council by the Convention. Other

issues were suggested by the twenty persons who comprise the Council. Some of the legislative concerns were pornography, liquor-by-the-drink, capital punishment, ERA, chaplains for prisons, etc.

The Council also sponsored a statewide workshop on death and dying, particularly as it re-

lated to euthanasia (easy death) or, as it is commonly called, "mercy killing."

Numerous calls from Baptists for help on social issues keep being received and responded to. The Council attempts to provide information on how to apply one's Christian faith to everyday life.

America suffers from a crisis in morality and integrity. Only as Christians live out their faith will a lost world be improved and changed. To that end the Christian Life Council is dedi-

cated.

#### THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The establishment of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation as an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina was approved in 1919 and chartered in 1920. The objectives of this agency of the Convention were clearly stated in its charter:

"1. To promote the making of gifts . . . for the causes and objects fostered by the members of the missionary Baptist denomination in the State of N. C., in their cooperative undertakings, and to provide a way of securing greater uniformity of purposes, powers, and duties of administration in the management and distribution of the gifts so made."

"2. To receive, own, hold administer, and distribute gifts of any kind . . . to be used for the promotion of the Missionary Baptist Cause in general or any specified object of the Mis-

sionary Baptist denomination . . ."

The Foundation continues to strive toward fulfilling the objectives stated in its charter. In so doing it will serve more as a trustee than as a foundation, as foundations are presently defined. As trustee the donor or benefactor make decisions relative to specific or general recipients of trust income.

The staff consists of the following employees: The Executive Secretary, Edwin S. Coates; Director of Estate Planning, Sara Ann Hobbs; Staff Assistant, Dianne Babb; Treasurer, Leon Spencer, and the Legal Counsel, Tom Dimmock, a Raleigh attorney, who is retained for frequent consultation and for preparation of contracts, agreements and other matters related to the work of the Foundation.

The emphasis of the Foundation is STEWARDSHIP We seek to create an increased awareness of and interest in a total Christian Commitment as it involves life and possessions.

The Foundation provides a unique channel for persons to provide tangible financial assistance for all Christian ministries fostered by Southern Baptists—FOREVER—by naming the Cooperative Program as beneficiary of trust funds. This option, of course, is one of many. The specific institution or mission cause may be named as trust beneficiary or any combination of these.

#### **BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT**

The beautiful stained glass window in the front of Davis Chapel at Baptist Hospital has three large panels, each depicting an aspect of Christ's ministry: healing, teaching, and preaching. The window serves as a reminder to the staff that Baptist Hospital has also been commissioned to this three fold task.

The hospital's primary task, obviously, is healing and it attempts to obtain and use the best personnel and equipment available for the healing task. The medical staff consists of competent, dedicated men and women in all the various specialties of medicine. Persons with rare and complicated medical problems are referred to Baptist Hospital by their family physicians for treatment. Last year 158,863 visits were made in the hospital's Outpatient Department and the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics. There were 22,365 admissions to the hospital for a

total of 193,942 patient days. These patients came from 90 counties in North Carolina, from 29 other states and from 3 foreign countries.

Baptist Hospital is also involved in teaching. In cooperation with Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest University, it helped to train 1,188 students last year for careers in medicine and allied health fields. In addition, there were 87 graduate students in the basic sciences. The hospital also provided clinical facilities for 483 student nurses from 3 nearby schools of nursing and for 120 students in other allied schools. The School of Pastoral Care last year enrolled a total of 75 students in various levels of Clinical Pastoral Education.

The hospital also has a preaching ministry. There is preaching in the formal sense at least four times a week in the worship services held in Davis Chapel. In a less formal sense, the Christian Gospel is proclaimed daily by staff, students, patients, and others who witness to

their faith in word and deed.

In all of these ministries, Baptist Hospital is mindful of its Christian heritage and its strong ties with the Baptist State Convention. This tie is maintained and strengthened through the services of capable dedicated trustees who are elected by and are responsible to the convention. The tie is also strengthened through the financial support from the churches; last year \$294,324 was received through the Cooperative Program and \$405,947 through the Mother's Day Offering.

Several members of the hospital staff have assumed active roles in the denominational life at the association level and the state convention level, as well as in their local churches. For the past five years hospital personnel have assisted in Cooperative Program promotion in at

least two associations each year.

Mother's Day gifts ending June 30, 1977 were \$411,225.56. Thanks.

#### HISTORICAL EVENTS FROM CHURCHES

Aberdeen

First Baptist Church, Rev. Charles S. Hinson, Pastor and Mrs Juanita R. Lomax, church clerk and historian.

Had a Christian Renewal Week jointly with the Methodist and Presbyterian churches. Four baptisms and additions during the year—20.

VBS had 115 enrollment. They have a full time Education-Youth Director, and music direc-

tor. A church library and a librarian.

They have new pew cushions, new hymn books for the choir. Through yearly improvements the church lawn and parking area are kept beautiful. The pew cushions and ramp built to help the elderly and those in wheel chairs given as memorials. They have a church bus.

#### **Bethlehem**

Rev. Thomas V. Herndon, pastor and Martin Hannon, historian. As we know their church sanctuary and educational building burned, March 20, 1977. That greatly curtailed their activities. This I included in their fine church library. They have not missed a Sunday without services. They are getting ready to build. They were fortunate in obtaining some more land

joining what they had.

Bethlehem is the oldest church in our association, organized in 1834. Evidently it was hard for the people to let go from Sandy Creek when our Sandhills Association was cut off. It was first South Sandy Creek. We note with interest they kept sending messengers to annual meetings in Sandy Creek until 1951. In the first records of Sandy Creek minutes we find in 1958 the messengers from Bethlehem were: P. Cadell, R. W. Barrett, and S. P. Phillips with 14 baptisms that year and church membership of 124.

#### Cameron

Rev. Carrol Fonvielle pastor and Mrs. James Hardy, historian. One revival held with 3 baptisms and total additions of 5. Their enrollment for Vacation Bible School was 72. They held a worship service at McCain.

James Williams is full time Youth and Choir Director. They have a church library and Miss Donne Pilson is librarian. New carpet in choir loft. Church pews were upholstered and 24

new hymnals bought.

They have had memorials given and Homecoming day observed in October. July 31, 1977 they paid off their debt on the new parsonage.

**Ephesus** 

Rev. E. P. Warren, pastor and Mrs. Viola Bowlin, Historian. Two revivals held with 3 additions by baptism. VBS had 85 enrolled and observed parents night with fellowship supper. Their church books were microfilmed from beginning of church in 1886 until 1965. Church yard and cemetery improved by re-sowing grass and the front lawns landscaped.

Mr. and Mrs. Jake Cooper of Sandford donated 100 new Baptist hymnals to the church in

memory of their parents. Will V. Fisher and Mrs. Florence McDonald Fisher.

Stewardship day observed in October, and churchwide observance of Foreign and Home Missions. Season of prayer and observance of State and Associational missions. January Bible Study led by the pastor WMU Focus week carried out by the WMU and youth organizations. Easter Sunrise service held on church lawn with fellowship breakfast following. Inspirational song services held quarterly with local choir and visiting choirs. 15 adults and youth from the youth organizations attend Youth Evangelism night in Greensboro.

Carthage

First Baptist Church, Dr. Michael C. Blackwell pastor. Woodrow Wilhoit clerk and historian. Had a revival and joined in a community wide Bible School. Have a library and librarian and a Music Director. A Youth Director for ten Weeks during the summer.

A Homecoming Day was in May, their 120th year as a church. Several memorials were

given.

On Sunday, Feb. 13, 1977, Dr. Cecil A. Ray, Executive secretary-treasurer of the N. C. Baptist Church, during the morning worship service.

The church members feel justly proud at having two outstanding Baptist leaders on the

state and national level to fill the pulpit—both during the same year.

Rev. Fulton Thomas, pastor. Historian, Mrs. Joe Matthews and Assistant, Betty Howard. Had two revivals with six baptisms and three additions by letter. Enrollment in VBS, 132 with four making profession of faith.

Rev. Fulton Thomas is their music and choir director. Their church records have been microfilmed and this year had their church yards landscaped.

Miss Andra Thomas is going into full time work for Christ and they have received several

memorials during the year.

Homecoming was May 1, 1977 with the dedicating service of their new church held at that time. The corner stone was laid. Guest speakers were: Rev. Micke Ray, Supt. of Missions, Sandhills Association giving the prayer of dedication, with Mrs. Gladys Dixon, widow of the late Rev. L. M. Dixon giving the responsive prayer, John Strother was guest soloist and Rev. Richard Smith of the State Baptist Convention delivered the sermon. Dinner was served on the grounds following the service.

Their pastor attended the SBC in Kansas City, Mo., and the State Baptist Convention.

#### Taylors Memorial

Pastor, Rev. Everette Havnes. They had one revival with five additions to membership roll. Having a music and choir director. They have a library with Miss Lela Russell giving all of her

The RA's played an important part in reworking the church yard and putting out more plants. The Bell Tower was completed and church sign put up all this given in memory of the late Marshall P. and Nancy M. Russell.

Hymnals given as memorial—8 in honor of people—9. The church donated 4 books to the library and forty books given as memorials and by friends making a total of 61 books for the church.

Mrs. Phillip Borroughs, member of this church is WMU director in our Association and Mrs. Lewis Russell is associational director of Mission Friends, Chaplain M. Carlisle Franks served the church as interim pastor for several weeks.

#### Unity Grove

Pastor, Rev. Hayes Ritter and historian, Mrs. Barbara Morgan. They had a revival but no additions. Their VBS had daily attendance of 46. They have a full time Youth Director and a choir director

In church improvements they added new aluminum gutters to church building and put down new motor and a new sound system installed in church.

#### Pleasant Hill

Pastor, Rev. Roy M. Little. Historian, Mrs. Majorie Priest. Had 2 revivals with 14 additions to membership roll, 147 enrolled in VBS with average daily attendance of 121 and 87 made perfect attendance. During Bible School several re-dedications made.

Oscar Bobbit is choir director. They are building a new parsonage, improved their church yard and walks and cleared more space for cemetery. They are remodeling the old church building for recreation and fellowship building and finished putting in cabinets and installing kitchen sink.

They purchased new hymnals.

#### Southern Pines

First Baptist Pastor, Rev. John D. Stone. They are now in the process of electing a historian. Rev. Bob Shepherd, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Sanford preached for their revival. They had 12 baptisms and with the ones joining by letter had 33 additions to membership roll. They had a total enrollment in VBS of 125.

Rev. Gary Hudson came to church Jan. 1, 1977 as full time Minister of Education and Youth Director. They have four choirs with a director for each choir. Have a church library with Susan David full time librarian.

January 30—Special Memorial and Dedication Service. Flags were presented by the families of Mr. Brock Causey and Mr. J. M. Tyson in memory of their Husbands and Fathers. The young people taking part in the Flag Ceremony were: Dawn Koonce, John Bullock, Bill Goodwin, Russell Tate, and Manson Tate.

February 28-WMU Dinner. Two books, A DYNAMIC CHURCH and HISTORY OF WMU

were reviewed by Mrs. Arthur Read and Mrs. Fred Taylor.

March—Week of Prayer. The GA's had the program on Wednesday night presenting a play on the HISTORY OF THE WMU and at that time received their collars and badges.

March 19—Associational Youth Night. During the program two youths, Dawn Koonce and Joy Hennings gave their personal testimony for Christ.

April 16—24 hour Prayer Vigil in preparation for revival.

April 17-21—Revival, Rev. Lee Proctor of Ives Memorial Church.

May 14—RA Conference. Boys of our church attended as well as Mrs. Barney Koonce and Mrs. Howard Hennings who helped with the judging of the Missions Projects.

June 13-17—Bible School.

June 26—GA's sang at the Chapel of the Pines at 7 Lakes and enjoyed an afternoon of recreation.

June 26—Brotherhood of our church sponsored a fish fry for the ladies of the church.

We are grateful for these churches that responded on time with their historical events this past year. Those that will be late will be put in the minutes so please get them on to either Mr. Ray or myself.

Your historian has tried to place in the church libraries in our association a copy of the "History of Sandy Creek Association, 1858-1958". Our Mother association. Also a copy went to Supt. of Missions office and to the Moore County Library. We have been able to get some more copies and if you want one for your church please let me know.

Note that only one church reported having their church records microfilmed with the N. C. Building of Archieves in Raleigh. One other church partially had theirs recorded. This is im-

portant so if your records should be destroyed you would have this to go on.

We would like to urge church clerks to make a notation on their records as to what church people move their membership to or come from. This is important for historians searching records in years to come.

#### Constitution

#### OF THE SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

#### ARTICE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be THE SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

#### ARTICLE II - PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, mission, Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

#### ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of, duly elected by, affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions; and other full-time

paid professional staff:

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairmen of all standing committees and the Superintendent of Missions.

Section 2 Affiliations

(1) The Churches affiliated with this Association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person upon his profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this, and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under the watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon

recommendation of the Credentials Committee.

(3) Baptist Churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist Associations may become affiliated with this Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee, and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.

(4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The Association recognized the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at Associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2—(1) of this Article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is no effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballot, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognized that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the Association in writing of this intention.

#### **ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS**

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after

the second Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the Associational Board is empowered to change the time or place of Meeting, cancel the Annual Meeting, or call a Special Meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two week's notice, if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the association meetings shall be limited to the duly

elected officers and messengers as set forth in ARTICLE III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

#### ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. OFFICERS: The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, three (3) Trustees,

and Superintendent of Missions.

Section 2. DEPARTMENTS: The Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following Departments: THE SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT, THE CHURCH TRAINING DEPARTMENT, THE YOUTH DEPARTMENT, THE BROTHERHOOD DEPARTMENT, THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT, THE EVANGELISM DEPARTMENT, THE STEWARDSHIP PROMOTIONS DEPARTMENT, THE LIBRARY SERVICES DEPARTMENT, THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION DEPARTMENT, AND ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS DEPARTMENT.

The Department Directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session Vacancies occuring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational

Board.

Section 3. ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD

Section 4. COMMITTEES: There shall be the following standing committees:
(1) Executive Committee; (2) Committee on Committees; (3) Nominating Committee; (4) Finance and Audit Committee; (5) Program Committee; (6) Committee on Constitution and By-Laws; (7) Credentials Committee; (8)

Committee on Ordinations; (9) Committee on Place and Preacher; (10) Committee

on Resolutions.

Section 5. EMPLOYEES: The Superintendent of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. REPRESENTATIVES: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder, and (6)

Baptist Foundation.

#### **ARTICLE VI - REVISION**

The association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist Bulletin in the last issue before the Annual Meeting.

#### ARTICEL VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the Thritieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution

and the following By-Laws.

### By-Laws

#### **ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES**

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its By-Laws.

#### ARTICLES II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. THE MODERATOR:

(1) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed:

(2) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms

(3) Shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the Association. Section 2. THE VICE- MODERATOR shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator, and shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. THE CLERK:

(1) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association;

(2) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational Minutes;

(3) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Assocaiton;

- (4) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget. Section 4. THE TREASURER:
- (1) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all moneys;

(2) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions;

(3) Shall provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational News Bulletin each month;

(4) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its

regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. THE HISTORIAN: Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.

Section 6. THE PARLIAMENTARIAN: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters

involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. THE TRUSTEES: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

#### Secton 8. THE SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS:

(1) Conditions of Employment

a. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the Missionary or the Association with a 30-days notice;

b. Shall have 3 weeks vacation with pay, the time to be determined in

consultation with the Executive Committee;

c. May be away from the Association for 3 weeks for revivals and/or schools of missions. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee;

d. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not

conflict with basic responsibilities;

- e. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed 5 Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time the church should contribute to the Associational treasury a reasonable remuneration for services;
- f. May serve as Chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

#### (2) Duties:

a. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability, to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention;

b. Shall give general oversight to the work of the Association and, with assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities

which shall be approved by the Associational Board:

c. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an

annual report to the Association;

d. Shall publish an attractive and informative Newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers;

e. Shall cultivate the friendship and good will of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate

with us in carrying out the Great Commission;

f. Shall be alert to the needs for mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local, affiliated church;

g. Shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the

Association.

### ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. SUNDAY SCHOOL DIRECTOR:

(1) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible school, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association;

(2) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task;

(3) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Associaton:

Section 2. CHURCH TRAINING DIRECTOR:

- (1) Shall study and seek to promote the Training Union work in the churches of the Association.
  - (2) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department:
- (3) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. YOUTH DIRECTOR:

(1) Shall seek to promote youth work in the churches of the Association through Council meetings, rallies, and retreats;

(2) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work:

(3) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. BROTHERHOOD DIRECTOR:

(1) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program, (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies;

(2) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the

support of the total program of the local church;

(3) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work:

(4) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. MUSIC DIRECTOR:

(1) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts:

(2) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association:

- (3) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility;
- (4) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. EVANGELISM DIRECTOR:

(1) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay-evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies;

(2) Shall appoint a Committee to assit in this work;

(3) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. STEWARDSHIP PROMOTIONS DIRECTOR:

(1) Shall encourage Christian stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals;

(2) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work;

(3) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association,

Section 8. LIBRARY SERVICES DIRECTOR

(1) Shall promote library services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, Audio-visual aid materials, and equipment;

(2 Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the

Association;

(3) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION DIRECTOR:

(1) Shall promote the total W.M.U. Program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies;

(2) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women, and girls

in the support of the total program of the church;

- (3) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to faciliate this work;
- (4) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Associaton.

Section 10. ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS DIRECTOR

(1) Shall lead the association in indentifying and evaluating is mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission program;

(2) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work;

(3) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches;

(4) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office;

(5) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an

annual report to the Association.

# ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD: Shall be composed of:

(1) The active pastors of member churches and missions;

(2) The officers of the Association;

(3) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association;

(4) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are or have been officers or elected leaders of that church;

(5) The President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Associatonal Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officer of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Superintendent of Missions, Directors of the various Departments, Associational W.M.U. Director, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board representative, and the President of the Associational Youth council. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as Chairman of this Committee. It shall be the duty of this Committee, cooperating with the Superintendent of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within the bounds of the Association.

Section 3. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES consisting of five members shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with

the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE, consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations for each office, departmental director of the association, and State Baptist Convention. Agencies Representatives are: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder, (6) Baptist Foundation, to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. THE FINANCE AND AUDIT COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various georgraphical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Association Board for their approval prior to its presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit or the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. THE PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present

at the annual meeting.

Section 7. THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS, consisting of four members shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Superintendent of Missions, and one member at large from the Association who

shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This Committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws as may be necessary to better serve the

purposes of the Association.

Section 8. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. The Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist Program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III Section 2 of the Constitution. This Committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2 (5) of the Constitution.

Section 9. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION, consisting of a chairman elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a condidate. The Committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services or ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. THE COMMITTEE ON PLACE AND PREACHER, consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual

sermon.

Section 11. THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS, consisting of three members, shall draw-up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the Committee or referred to it by the Association.

### ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BY-LAWS

The Association may amend or alter the By-Laws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present, at the annual meeting provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist Bulletin in the last issue before the Annual Session.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The Sunday School Department of Sandhills Baptist Association sponsored a "Wise-Up" Conference for workers with youth in Sunday School. It was held in January, 1978, at Southern Pines FBC. Mr. Bill Byrd, consultant in the youth area with the Sunday School Department of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, conducted the conference. More than twenty youth workers were present. They represented six of the twenty-five churches.

The annual Pastor-Director Workshop was held in September at Aberdeen FBC. Dinner was served to the nineteen pastors and directors who attended.

They were informed of the age group emphasis on Single Adults for the year 1978-79. Tenative plans for the association-wide single adult retreat were disclosed. The other major topics of discussion were Sunday School Preparation Week and Witness To Win, the book for study during the week, which was suggested to be September 24-29.

During the Key Leadership Conference, held September 11, each church was presented with a possible goal for their Sunday School if they are going to increase Sunday School enrollment by twenty-two per cent in 1982. Several programs for increasing Sunday School enrollment and attendance were

discussed.

The Sunday School Department also has responsibility for conducting the Vacation Bible School Clinics. In 1978 there were two firsts here. For the first time we had leadership in nine areas in Vacation Bible School. There were two pre-school, three children, one youth, one adult, one general officer, and one mission VBS and Backyard Bible Club representatives. Also, for the first time there was more than one Associational Clinic. On April 24, Clinic #1 was held at Carthage FBC. Clinic #2 was held on April 25 at Aberdeen FBC. There were more than 80 workers trained to work in Vacation Bible Schools in their church. Then a mini-make-up clinics was conducted at Vass Baptist Church because their workers were involved in revival the week of the two clinics.

### STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Your stewardship chairman has been busy during the past year in planning stewardship emphases. In February, O. D. Martin, Jr., Director of Stewardship for our Baptist State Convention, met with seventeen of our pastors in Robbins and challenged our leaders on the theme "Bold Missions in Stewardship." In May, a meeting was held at Union Pines High School. Thirty-five pastors and lay-persons attended. Churches were challenged to be good stewards in providing adequate salaries and fringe benefits for their church staff members. It is my desire and prayer, that I can be instrumental in helping all the churches in our association to double their gifts at home, to double their gifts to the Sandhills Association, and to double their gifts through the Cooperative Program - and do all of these by 1982. I shall welcome an opportunity

to be of service to you.

### **EVANGELISM REPORT**

The Book of Acts shows how the apostles went out into the world to be evangelists. They were men with a message to proclaim which they knew to be true from personal experience, a message which they regarded as a matter of life and death to all mankind, and a message which they were ready to proclaim, come what may. Evangelism is the heart of the New Testament Church. Evangelism must be first. By Evangelism I mean "offering the good news of the forgiveness of sins in Jesus Christ to those who do not have it and urging them to accept it." That must take priority; it must be the overriding theme of all that we do in the ministry of

the Kingdom.

From the Associational Evangelism level we try to urge and encourage every church and every Christian to become evangelists, to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ. This past year an Evangelism Awareness Clinic and an Evangelism Rally were held on February 27, 1978 at the First Baptist Church Aberdeen. Dr. William Lamb, Director of Evangelism from Raleigh conducted the clinic and spoke at the Rally.

As a part of our Bold Mission Thrust, we bring the following recommendations

for the year 1979:

"We recommend that the weeks of September 30-October 14, 1979, be set at Sandhills Baptist Association Simultaneous Revival Weeks, and that each pastor and each church of the Sandhills Association be urged to choose one of these two weeks for special revival effort; and that during each of these two weeks certain meetings be set up for all pastors and guest evangelists participating in these revivals, for fellowship and sharing."

### YOUTH REPORT

The Sandhills Baptist Associational Youth Council met three times during the past year. At the first meeting held in Carthage, Robbin Marsh of Red Branch Baptist Church was elected president; Denise White of Ephesus was elected Vice President; and Lisa Haywood of Bethlehem was elected Secretary.

The Associational Youth Night Program was held Saturday, March 18, 1978, at the First Baptist Church, Southern Pines. The Theme was "Youth Talent For Christ." Several young people participated in the talent performances. A young lady student from Meredith College brought a message in music. Larry Williams, "pastor on Campus" of Meredith College brought an inspiring and challenging message.

Beginning October 15th the Associational Youth Council will meet the third Sunday of each month at 3:00 P.M. at the Carthage Baptist Church. Gary Hudson will be the new Associational Youth Director. Gary would like for each church to elect one girl and one boy and one adult leader and an alternate to attend each meeting. Plans are in the making for a good year for the youth of the Association.

### ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The year 1977 was one of contrasts for the Annuity Board. While the Board grew markedly in new retirement and insurance accounts, investment earnings suffered due to poor stock market performance.

The year also represented a period of strong demands which resulted from servicing needs of new accounts, a complex asset allocation process, implementation of a new church retirement program and accounting responsibilities of new investment funds.

Key statistics in 1977 included:

1. A permanent 8.33 per cent increase in most annuitants' checks. The increase was retroactive to January 1.

 A total of \$19,085,316 paid in retirement and protection benefits. Insurance benefits through church, agency and seminarian programs exceeded \$12 million.

3. The enrollment of 545 new churches in the basic retirement plan. New pastors and church employees in Plan A numbered 2,169, and 3,000 members upgraded their program.

In 1977, premium income totaled \$45,603,942 - including relief. Total assets

climbed to \$498,977,661, compared with \$473,142,631 a year earlier.

In North Carolina as of March 31, 1978, 3,387 staff members of 2,257 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program. In the Sandhills Association 17 churches and 26 staff members are participating in the retirement program. The Association is also participating for their Director.

### BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

The program, services and facilities of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina are being utilized well for the care of children and in providing assistance to families that need our help. North Carolina Baptists and other friends continue to support this ministry through personal involvement, prayer and financial support. It is the purpose of the Homes to provide quality care and to be worthy of the faith and confidence of our many friends and supporters.

Requests are coming to the Homes from various sections of the state for additional community-based services (such as, emergency care and group homes.) This is a wholesome trend in child care. Children can best be served and families strengthened when care can be provided reasonably close to a child's home. Our homes have been moving in that direction for several years. We will respond to additional requests for programs and services as financial resources permit.

We are in constant need of well qualified staff. This is particularly true of cottage and foster home parents. Join us in prayer that God will impress upon sufficient numbers of prospective workers that child care is a Christian vocation

and that it affords wonderful opportunities for service.

We are deeply grateful for support of the Children's Homes which comes from our churches through the Cooperative Program, special gifts and the traditional Thanksgiving offering.

The fourthcoming Thanksgiving offering is extremely important. This will be the last time that our pledge will have the challenge of making an over and above offering to the Children's Homes at Thanksgiving time. As a part of the Bold Missions thrust, the Thanksgiving offering for the Children's Homes in 1979 will become a part of the North Carolina Baptist State Missions offering to be received each September thereafter.

To bridge the transitional gap next year, our trustees have set a goal of \$1,000,000 (one million dollars) through the 1978 Thanksgiving offering. We are dependent upon our friends for financial support sufficient to carry on this

ministry.

### NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

A survey in several counties representative of the cross-section of our state has provided interesting information regarding the seriousness, or lack of seriousness, to which stewardship of estates is considered. Court records and wills were carefully studied in these counties to determine the disposition of possessions for a specific time. Facts revealed were:

1. 30% of the decedants died without a written will.

2. Very little was provided for the church or any charitable cause through the wills that were probated (Six-tenths of one percent was given to all charitable causes and only 65 one-thousandths of one percent was left to all Baptist causes.).

3. 45% of all assets were left either to husbands or wives, 37% of all assets were left to children by parents, and 27% was left to grandchildren or other

persons.

4. Projected to a statewide basis for one year, two-thirds of one billion dollars

is left in estates each year.

5. Based on resident Baptist population in the state, a tithe of the estates of Baptists that die each year would provide in excess of \$10,000,000 additional dollars annually to the support of Christian missions and ministries carried on by our churches and denomination.

Baptists who believe in Bold Mission endeavors will:

1. prepare a will or have their will updated;

- 2. provide for their church pledges and commitments to be fulfilled through their will:
  - 3. seriously consider a tithe of their estates to a Christian cause.


An excellent example to follow is that set by two members of one church in the mountain area of North Carolina. They have willed their possessions to the North Carolina Baptist Foundation as Trustee. Ten percent of each estate will go back to their church and 90% in trust will be paid annually to the Cooperative Program through their church - an amount equal to the entire church contribution to the Cooperative Program in 1977. (And this was a substantial amount.) These two persons through their wills will double the church gifts to missions.

During 1977-1978 fiscal year, the Foundation has received \$198,139 in addition to the trust funds being held. Twenty-seven new trusts were established.



Anyone using Foundation services and who designates through their will a bequest to any Baptist institution or Baptist mission cause can have their will prepared at no cost. Assistance in cost can also be provided for those who desire to have their wills prepared or reviewed by a local attorney.

### BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

North Carolina Baptists have the following Baptist Homes for the aging:

1. Resthaven, located in Winston-Salem, with space for 16 residents.

- 2. The Hayes Home and the Nursing Care Unit, in Winston-Salem with space for 46 residents, and 79 patients.
  - 3. The Albemarle Home, in Albemarle with space for 30 residents.
  - 4. The Hamilton Home, in Hamilton, with space for 28 residents.
  - 5. The Yanceyville Home, in Yanceyville, with space for 31 residents.
- 6. The Western North Carolina Baptist Home, in Asheville, with space for 50 residents, now under construction.

Our Baptist Homes for the Aging have received vital support from our more than 3,400 Baptist churches through two vital sources through the years:

1. The Cooperative Program, which supplies about 8% of our total budget;

2. The Special Offering which supplies 16% of our total budget.

These gifts are used to supplement the care of the majority of the residents who could not possibly pay the cost of care, if it were not for these gifts. We are grateful for these gifts and for every church and every person who has had a part in making them possible.

Of interest in our Homes for the Aging in projected growth and service is a new proposed wing to the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem which will house 51 additional patients and residents and bring our total capacity in all of the Homes and the Nursing Care Unit to 351 persons.

The growing edge of our national and state population is in the area of the aging, those 65 years of age and above. We must continue to prepare for them and move out, by the Lord's help, to undertake more for them in our churches, our communities, and in our Baptist Homes for the Aging.

Will you join us in our prayers and in our plans for those aging persons who look to us for help.

### BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Baptist Hospital continues to find ways of enlarging and improving its care of patients. During the past year, the Department of Family Medicine moved into new quarters. It is anticipated that with the larger area, the Family Practice Center will provide primary health care for more than 5,000 families by 1980. Also, the teaching program for resident physicians in Family Medicine will increase to 36 positions by 1980. Many of these physicians are expected to enter family practice in North Carolina.

Other improvements in patient care include the installation of a whole-body scanner and the opening of new and larger facilities for the Intensive Care and Intermediate Nurseries. The Body scanner is particularly useful in locating and defining problems such as tumors in the chest, abdomen and pelvic areas; in determining the spread of disease from one organ to another; and visualizing aneurysms in the abdomen. The new nurseries have already played a significant role in reducing the infant death rate and in improving the chances of premature babies growing up without lasting effects from earlier medical problems.

Creation of a new Department of Patient Relations and the employment of a full-time director has also helped to improve the quality of patient care. The primary function of this department is to respond to specific concerns patients

have regarding their hospital care and to act in behalf of patients and their

families in resolving problems and meeting needs.

A closed-circuit television system will soon be carrying services from the hospital chapel, other devotional programs and educational programs to patient rooms. This system will also be used in staff education programs. The equipment was purchased with funds from the estate of Miss Olivia Hall who worked for Baptist Hospital for nearly a half-century.

In recent months, the Medical Center Challenge Program completed a successful fund campaign, over-subscribing its \$18-million goal. The final project in this program will be the replacement of the original hospital building, opened in

1923, with a new Focus Building which is scheduled for completion in 1980.

### 1978 BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT

Think about it for a minute. What if there were no BIBLICAL RECORDER? What means of communication would keep our Baptist people together in the state? What if we had to depend entirely on the secular news media?

One of the most important jobs of the BIBLICAL RECORDER is to keep members of Baptist churches informed about what's going on in our denomination, not only here in North Carolina but around the world. When people know, they respond more quickly and in a more cooperative and generous manner.

In that connection, there's one more question: Does the RECORDER pay? Recently the RECORDER published a list of 50 churches which had the best percapita giving to the Cooperative Program. Forty nine of the 50 had a good RECORDER club, many of them sending the RECORDER to every resident family. The BIBLICAL RECORDER had a part in helping these congregations see the importance of supporting Baptist causes.

More than 1,100 churches provide their families with the RECORDER through the church budget at a cost of only 6 cents a week. Everyone benefits when the

RECORDER goes into every home.

The price of the RECORDER remains reasonable, despite tremendous increases in postage, paper and printing. If your church plans to put the RECORDEP in the budget, it should do so this year and thus save money because a price increase is likely.

With the dripping wet news media in North Carolina, our Baptist people must depend on the RECORDER for information about such matters as liquor by the drink. This is only one reason for every church to have a good RECORDER club

or put in in the budget.

Woodrow W. Hil, assistant editor and field representative for the past seven years, reached retirement age this past year but has agreed to continue to help the RECORDER in associations and churches. He is loved by people all over the state and we are glad that he will continue to be identified with the RECORDER when needed for special assignments.

### CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

Baptists of North Carolina support and operate, through elected trustees, six colleges and one university: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill,

Meredith, Wingate and Wake Forest University. The histories of these colleges and the Baptist State Convention have intersected and intertwined since 1834. While not all of the colleges were begun by the Convention per se, all were begun by Baptists, with strong convictions about the need for Christian higher education.

Baptist colleges serve Christ and Baptist people best when they are truest to operating in the field of enlightenment. A Christian college is a college founded and maintained and conducted by Christian people in the service of the Kingdom of God.

Churches are urged to encourage their youth to attend a Baptist college. Most of the students attending a North Carolina Baptist college receive some form of financial assistance. Each of the colleges pledges to assist needy students with financial aid. Students who need to apply for financial aid should make application to college early in the senior year of high school. Grants, loans and work scholarships are available for those who need them.

North Carolina Baptist colleges continue to be grateful for generous financial support through the Cooperative Program. The colleges reaffirm their support and partnership in missions with the churches, and offer the services of faculty, students and other campus resources to make the Bold Missions emphasis of

Southern Baptists a vital and successful ministry.

### CHRISTIAN LIFE AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS REPORT

The Christian Life Council is comprised of twenty persons elected by the State Convention. These persons give overall leadership to the Council's staff.

A number of moral concerns were addressed by the Council in 1978. Family relationships continue to be a high priority. Opportunities such as marriage enrichment retreats, a workshop on parenting, single adult emphasis, and minister-wife retreats were conducted by the Council. Various materials dealing with family life were produced and distributed. Strengthening the Christian home is essential to the welfare of our nation and churches and the Christian Life Council is committed to that task.

Much energy was spent working for the defeat of the liquor by the drink bill. Over 125,000 flyers were distributed to North Carolina Baptists. While the efforts of Baptists did not defeat the bill, our efforts did result in a better bill being

passed than the one originally proposed.

Another concern of the Council is television and its impact upon the morals of our people. Over 60,000 copies of "The Grabber", a pamphlet dealing with the use and abuse of television, were distributed upon request. Unless Baptists learn to control television, it will control them by occupying their thoughts and time.

World Hunger is an issue which haunts all of us. The Council has printed and is distributing thousands of tracts which offer practical suggestions for Baptists on how to respond to world hunger. August 2 is World Hunger Day among Southern Baptists and the Council attempted to help Baptists be aware of this emphasis.

On several occasions Jesus stated that His disciples were to reflect their faith in Him through their lifestyles. Discovering the will and the way of Jesus is what

the Council seeks to do.

September 26 Womens Missionary Union Conference was held in our church


under the leadership of Mrs. Phillip Boroughs.





# Constitution

Of The

## SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

## **ARTICLE I - NAME**

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

## ARTICLE II - PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

7

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, mission, Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

## ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of, duly elected by, affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions, and other full-

time paid professional staff.

(3) Duly elected officers of the association, department directors, chairpersons of all standing committees and the director of missions.

Section 2. Affiliations

(1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this, and other doctrinal matters, the association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under the watchcare of the association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under

watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.

(3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with this association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee, and the approval of the Associational Board or the association.

- (4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognized the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the association.
- (5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is no effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the association. The association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballot, may then withdraw its fellowship. The association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the

association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the association in writing of this intention.

## **ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS**

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the Associational Board is empowered to change the time or place of meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two week's notice, if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

## ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the association shall be moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, parliamentarian, three (3)

trustees, and director of missions.

Section 2. Departments: The association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the association in annual session. Vacancies occuring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees: (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit (5) Progress (6) Constitution and Rulews

(4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and By-laws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The director of missions and any other employees of the association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder,

and (6) Baptist Foundation.

## **ARTICLE VI - REVISION**

The association may amend or alter the constitution by a vote of twothirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual meeting.

## ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this association shall be governed by the foregoing

constitution and the following by-laws.

# By-Laws

## ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of **Robert's Rules of Order** where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its By-Laws.

## ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator:

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
  - (b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one year terms.
- (c) Shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. Vice- Moderator: Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator, or in the absence of the Moderator, and shall be chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk:

- (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
- (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational budget.

Section 4. Treasurer:

- (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
- (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational newsletter each month.
- (d) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. Historian: Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.

Section 6. Parliamentarian: Shall advise and assit the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. Trustees: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association, and they shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

(a) Conditions of Employment:

1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary of the Association with a 30 day notice.

2. Shall have 3 weeks vacation with pay, the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.

3. May be away from the Association for 3 weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.

4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do

not conflict with basic responsibilities.

- 5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed 5 Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time the church should contribute to the associational treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
- 6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(b) Duties:

1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability, to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; to work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; to encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; to promote missionary interest among the churches; and to enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.

2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of

activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.

3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board

and an annual report to the Association.

4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.

5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to

cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.

6. Shall be alert to the needs for mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local, affiliated church.

7. Shall be an ex-officio member of standing committees of the

Association.

## ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.

(b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training

department.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
  - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

(a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in

the support of the total program of the local church.

(c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

(a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.

(b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at

all meetings of the Association.

(c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

(a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

(a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audio-visual aid materials, and equipment.

(b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors

of the Association.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

(a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program

(Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women,

and girls in the support of the total program of the church.

(c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

(a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.

(b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational

Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.

(c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.

(d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.

(e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
  - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

# ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

(a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.

(b) The officers of the Association.

(c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.

(d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are or have been officers or elected leaders of that church.

(e) The President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the

policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting to the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year and this information shall be published in the Associational calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk,

Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastor's Conference. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as Chairperson of this Committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members, shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency

Representatives.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonable embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to

the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and By-laws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Director of Missions, and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-laws as may be necessary to serve

better the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practives, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Artical III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5) of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services or services or ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual

sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expressions of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

## ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BY-LAWS

The Association may amend or alter the By-laws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present, at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

## RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

We recommend that our Constitution be amended or altered as follows:

1. Article IV - Meetings, Section 1: Replace "Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October" with "Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October." (Motion Passed).

2. Article V - Organization, Section 2. Departments: Replace "and Associational Missions Department" with "Associational Missions Department, and Senior Citizens Department." (Motion passed).

3. Article V - Organization, Section 5. Employees: Delete "Or the

Association in annual meeting." (Motion defeated).

4. Update and correct terminology, punctuation, and spelling, including replacement of "Superintendent of Missions" with "Director of Missions" and "Sandhills Baptist Bulletin" with "our associational newsletter." (Motion passed).

We recommend that our By-laws be amended or altered as follows:

1. Article II - Duties of Officers, Section 4. The Treasurer: Add "(5) shall provide the chairman of the Finance and Audit Committee all Associational bank statements each month for reconciliation and

return." (Motion tabled).

2. Article II - Duties of Officers, Section 8. The Superintendent of Missions, (1) Conditions of Employment, a.: Replace "Shall be called on an indefinite basis" with "Shall be called for an indefinite length of time after election by the Associational Board upon recommendation of a Director of Missions Search Committee of not more than seven (7) members. The members of this Director of Missions Search Committee shall be recommended by the Nominating Committee (including its exofficio members) and elected by the Associational Board which may also nominate members of the Director of Missions Search Committee." (Motion tabled).

3. Article III - Duties of Department Directors: Add "Section 11. Associational Senior Citizens Director (1) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of senior citizens in our Association; (2) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work; (3) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make

an annual report to the Association." (Motion passed).

4. Article IV - Composition and Duties of the Associational Board and Committees, Section 2. The Executive Committee: Add to the end of the first sentence "and the President of the Associational Pastor's Conference." (Motion passed).

5. Article IV, Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Add "This committee including its ex-officio members, shall, as needed, recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director

of Missions Search Committee." (Motion tabled).

6. Article IV, Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Add "It shall be the duty of the chairman of this committee to reconcile the Association's bank account statements each month, report his findings to the Director of Missions, and return said bank account statements to the Treasurer." (Motion tabled).97

7. Update and correct terminology, punctuation, and spelling, including replacement of "Superintendent of Missions" with "Director of Missions" and "Sandhills Baptist Bulletin" with "our associational newsletter" wherever these appear. (Motion passed).

Personal recommendation of E. P. Warren:

# REPORTS OF REPRESENTATIVES

#### BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Although growth in bed capacity at Baptist Hospital has leveled off at just under 700 beds, there is continuing expansion of the hospital's services. This expansion results from new discoveries made through medical

research, and is in response to the health care needs of people.

During the past year a 38-bed rehabilitation unit has opened to offer short-term services and family instruction to the disabled. The chief beneficiaries of this program are patients with strokes, arthritis, burns, long-term casts, joint replacement surgery, brain tumors, spinal cord injuries, hand injuries, and some cardiac problems.

A new six-bed burn unit is scheduled to open soon. This unit will permit the isolation of burn patients in a location where all required services are

immediately available.

An automatic clinical analyzer, the first of its kind in the state, has been acquired and put into operation. This fully automated analyzer, which uses computer technology, can perform more than 200 tests. It analyzes blood serum and body fluids and provides results in less than eight minutes. These prompt and accurate results are of particular importance in critical care areas, such as the emergency room.

Another new ministry is a program of home visitation for children with cancer and their families. A team consisting of physicians, nurses, a psychologist and chaplains ministers to families during three critical periods: when a child has received a recent diagnosis of cancer, when a

child is terminally ill, when a child has recently died.

Our chaplains lead worship services in Davis Chapel, which are relayed to all patient rooms by closed-circuit television. They also provide a pastoral ministry to patients, their families and to staff members; provide more than 15,000 hours of personal counselling annually; offer personal growth and enrichment events to hundreds of clergy and lay persons each year; and conduct the largest program of clinical pastoral education in the world. Ministries of the Pastoral Care department are made accessible to people across the state through satellites in Fayetteville, Raleigh, Morganton and Charlotte.

Baptist Hospital has actively participated in the Voluntary Effort to keep hospital costs as low as possible. Our hospital and several of its employees have been recognized and received awards for their cost-saving ideas and efforts. Our patients benefit in that the hospital's room rate increase this year - despite continuing inflation - is only 5%, as compared to

an annual increase of 6% in recent years.

In recent months the hospital's oldest building - "Old Main" - has been

torn down and a new six-story Focus Building is now rising on this site.

Our hospital staff members have been working with representatives from other denominational agencies and with leaders of the Baptist State Convention to promote the N. C. Missions Offering. The hospital looks forward to receiving its share of this offering, as gifts from the churches in the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$196,516, as compared to \$388,122 in the preceeding fiscal year.

## NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

Since January 1, 1979, the Foundation staff with the assistance from Rev. James B. McQuere, retired Director of Missions of the South Fork Baptist Association, an intensive effort has been made through conferences over the state to familiarize as many pastors as possible of the helpful services provided by the Baptist State Convention through the North Carolina Baptist Foundation. The Foundation is available to assist individual Baptist with their estate planning, regardless of the size of the estate. Many of the most significant and meaningful gifts to support the Christian ministries through the denomination have been directed through the Foundation as trustee. These services are available from the trained staff and their professional support (accounting and legal services) employed for this purpose without cost to individual participants. Where an individual desires to be a part of sharing the gospel beyond his or her lifetime, the establishment of a trust with the Foundation provides a tangible participation in such activities.

The Foundation has been actively engaged in assisting individuals in not only having their Wills redrafted, but also in the preparation and establishment of annuity trusts. Through such a trust, an individual or couple can place in trust assets (such as property, cash or securities) and receive income for the remainder of their lives. After death, the income from the trust will be paid to the donor's choice(s) of Baptist missions work and/or institution. This method of giving provides the satisfying knowledge of being a faithful steward in utilizing resources more completely for the Lord's ministries, as well as, taking advantage of the laws of our land in reducing taxation on resources - both income and estates.

as everyone did in the past year-price increases in every phase of its operations. The cost of postage continues to go up at a rate of more than 30 percent a year. This means the **Recorder** is costing four times as much to

mail as it did five years ago.

Paper and printing also have gone up, but despite these increases, the **Recorder** still is about the most reasonable publication available. By keeping the staff small and cutting corners wherever possible, the **Recorder** can still go into every home in a church for only 71/2¢ a week. In today's inflationary world, where else can a person receive so much for so little money? You would pay twice that much for postage on a first class letter.

This has been a newsworthy year and the **Recorder** has tried to keep you informed. Wake Forest University and its relationship to the Baptist State Convention continues to be in the news and you can depend on the **Recorder** to strive for fairness and responsible coverage. Action will be taken at the State Convention in November on a proposal that has been

worked out by a special committee.

The Southern Baptist Convention in Houston was another important story this year and as always, the Recorder was there. Even though the Recorder takes pride in its coverage of denominational news and events, it devotes more space to the local church than any other state paper in the Southern Baptist Convention. The Recorder believes in the local church as the foundation stone of what we are trying to do together as Southern Baptists. Strong churches result in a strong denomination. The editor is completing 20 years and is still striving to make the Recorder better each week. Your support of the Recorder will not only mean much to it but will make you a stronger and better informed Christian. If you and your church do not receive the Recorder, please take steps immediately to see that this is done.

## BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

Dr. W. R. Wogoner, President of the Baptist Children's Homes of N.C., Inc., sent a letter to the pastors and churches on March 19, 1979, and an annual report that covered the period of October 1, 1977-Sept. 30, 1978. A variety of services rendered were described, financial information given, and some projections for the future were made. Appreciation was expressed to Baptists and other friends for making possible the Child Care ministries.

Under the title, "A New Day is Dawning in Child Care," the report attractively shares information about the many ministries of the Homes. This is in keeping with its stated purpose: "... the care of dependent, neglected and homeless children; emotionally disturbed children; unwed mothers and their children; and the rendering of related services to their relatives." Cooperation with other agencies and counseling services to families are other important aspects of the purpose.

Homes and Centers for Child Care, Child Development, Counseling, Social Work, Family Education, (including a maternity Home in Asheville),

are located in the Piedmont, Eastern and Western areas.

The report further states: "Modern day child care, as provided by the

Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina is a Christian ministry. Child Care is . . . A Ministry of Evangelism, a Ministry of Missions, a Ministry of Education, A Ministry of Conservation and Rehabilitation, A Ministry of Love and Affection, A Ministry of Discipline and Teaching, A Ministry of Redemption.

The Development Department seeks to inform the public of the services offered. This is done through the publication, Charity and Children,

brochures, letters, news releases, radio and television and friends,

Capital Projections and Long Range Development Plans are projected to provide for 850 children in daily care by 1985. It is projected to meet the needs of children and families from 1978-1985.

To help meet the pressing needs of the Child Care ministries, endowments, trusts, annuities, bequests or foundations can be established

to serve a donor's broad or specific interest.

#### CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

The 1978-79 year witnessed change and progress. Enrollments were stable; budgets were balanced; Wingate College made history by graduating the first senior class; Campbell, once known as a senior college, announced a name change to Campbell University; the Campbell Law School graduated its first class; and churches all across the state answered the Council's request for names and addresses of prospective college students. In the main, it was a very good year for Baptist colleges. According to the latest figures printed by the Education Commission, SBC, of the 134,000 students attending the 53 Baptist colleges in the Convention, almost 20,000 are enrolled in our North Carolina Schools. Thus, 15% of all Baptist college enrollments are located in this state.

All North Carolina Baptists are now aware of the current discussions between Wake Forest and the Council Committee to Study the Wake Forest University Proposal. Many hours of study and work have been given by that committee, and this work will continue at least until the Convention meets in Winston-Salem on November 13-14, 1979. The Concil will make its recommendation to the General Board, and the General Board will report

and recommend to the Convention.

We thank you for supporting the colleges. We call upon the churches to pray for all of our Baptist work, including the colleges. We look toward the crucial decisions in the fall with confidence in North Carolina Baptists, who have been supporting Christian higher education for almost 150 years.

- 1. Restheaven, located in Winston-Salem, with space for 16 residents.
- 2. The Albermarle Home, in Albermarle with space for 30 residents.
- 3. The Hamilton Home, in Hamilton with space for 28 residents.
  4. The Haves Home, and the Nursing Care Unit in Winston-Salem
- 4. The Hayes Home, and the Nursing Care Unit in Winston-Salem with space for 46 residents and more than 80 patients.

5. The Yanceyville Home, in Yanceyville with space for 31 residents.

6. The Western North Carolina Baptist Home, in Asheville with 50 residents.

More than 3,400 Baptist Churches in North Carolina are Ministering to the security of life's needs of the aging through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering.

The gifts are used to supplement the care of the majority of the residents who could not possible pay the cost of care, if it were not for these gifts.

We are grateful for these gifts and for every church, and every person who had a part in making this possible. Will you join us in prayer and in our plans for those aging persons who look to us for help.

#### ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The year 1978 was a "banner year" and a year of challenge for the Annuity Board in servicing churches and agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention according to Dr. Darold H. Morgan, president. Among the challenges he listed were extremes of market variations, staggering pressures of escalating costs, changes in personnel and organization, and the eroding presence of governmental regulations.

The banner side highlights included:

1. A "13th Check" equalling an additional full month's benefit and amounting to \$1,036,914 was mailed to almost 10,000 annuitants in Board retirement programs.

2. A total of \$25,558,637 was paid in retirement and protection benefits. Insurance benefits through church, agency and seminarian programs

topped \$13 million.

3. An Endowment Department, designed to seek funds for undergirding protection programs, was established. A goal of \$25 million by 1988 was set.

4. New churches in the retirement program numbered 630, a record enrollment. New pastors and church employees totaled 2,545 with 3,721

members upgraded programs.

- 5. Participants in the new Southern Baptist Retirement Program grew to 6,066. Family Benefit section (plan a) counted 23,986 members, and Age Security Section (Plan b) recorded a marked increase from 33,062 in 1977 to 44,324. Variable Benefit Section (Plan c) membership declined from 4,885 to 4,217.
- 6. Premium income reached \$51,797,996 (includes a relief). Total assets climbed to \$569,734,471, compared with \$498,977,661 a year earlier.

In North Carolina as of March 31, 1979, 2,953 staff members of 2,290 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program.

In Sandhills Association, 20 churches and 22 staff members are

participating in the retirement program.

#### CHRISTIAN LIFE AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS REPORT

The Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs is made up of twenty persons selected by the Convention. Eight come from the General Board, while the remaining twelve are elected at-large. These persons give overall leadership to the Council's staff.

There have been two changes in the staff. W. Douglas Cole has recently been named Director of the Division of Christian Life and Public Affairs. Earlier in the year Ted W. Williams was named Director of the Department

of Aging.

The Christian Life Council has been concerned with a number of moral issues during 1979. The status and health of the family is of great importance. In an effort to strengthen family relationships, the Council has been involved in marriage enrichment retreats and associational family life conferences. In addition, a marriage enrichment retreat was held for ministers and their spouses. A family life poster has been printed and is being made available to the churches.

## Constitution

Of The

#### SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

#### ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

#### ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

#### ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of

messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers..

(2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-

time paid professional staff.

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

(1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under the watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under

watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.

(3) Baptist churches affiliated with this association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.

- (4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the association.
- (5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the association. The association, by majority vote of its messengers casting

ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the association in writing of its intention.

#### ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday

after the third Sunday in October.

2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

3. Voting in the association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected

officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

#### ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the association shall be moderator. vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, parliamentarian, three (3) trustees, and director of missions.

Section 2. Departments: The association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the associaiton in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees: (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and By-laws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The director of missions and any other employees of the association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Chilren's Homes,

(3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblicar Recorder, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

## ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The association may amend or alter the constitution by a vote of twothirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before tha annual meeting.

#### ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this association shall be governed by the foregoing

constitution and the following by-laws.

# By-Laws

#### **ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES**

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of **Robert's Rules of Order** where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its By-Laws.

#### ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator:

(a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.

(b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year

terms

(c) Shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. Vice-Moderator: Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk:

- (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
- (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. Treasurer:

- (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
- (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
  (c) Shall provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational newsletter each month.

(d) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. Historian: Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.

Section 6. Parliamentarian: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. Trustees: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed,

or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

(a) Search Committee:

1 The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

(b) Conditions of Employment:

1 Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.

2. Shall have 3 weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in

consultation with the Executive Committee.

3. May be away from the Association for 3 weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.

4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not

conflict with basic responsibilities.

- 5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed 5 Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable renumeration for services.
- 6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c) Duties:

- 1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- 2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.

3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and

an annual report to the Association.

4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.

5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to

cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.

6. Shall be alert to the needs for mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.

7. Shall be an ex-officio member of standing committees of the

Association.

## ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.
  - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.
    (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an

annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.
- (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
  - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

(a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men. Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in

the support of the total program of the local church.

(c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

(a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.

(b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at

all meetings of the Association.

(c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this

responsibility.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

(a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
  - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audio-visual aid materials and equipment.

(b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

(a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women,

and girls in the support of the total program of the church.

(c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

(a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.

(b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational

Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.

(c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.

(d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.

(e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
  - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

# ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

(a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.

(b) The officers of the Association.

(c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.

(d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at lease two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.

(e) The President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the

policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting to the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational

Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastor's Conference. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as Chairperson of this Committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two

consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed, recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational Budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to

the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and By-laws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-laws as may be necessary to serve

better the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2 (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services or services or ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual

sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

#### ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BY-LAWS

The Association may amend or alter the By-laws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each propsed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

## GENERAL BOARD REPORT - 1980

Some significant changes have been made this year in the work of the General Board. A new type of organizational structure has been set up to

utilize the work of General Board members more fully. The various committees and councils under the new format have more input into the work of the Board. Heretofore, most of the work was done by the Executive Committee and recommendations were brought to the Board for its approval or rejection. Under the new format each General Board committee and council deals within its area of work and brings its own recommendations to the full Board. This has improved the work of the Board and has eliminated the "rubber stamp" image that the Board has had in the past.

Some significant actions have been taken by the Board this year. Time nor space will not permit the listing of all of the, but the more important ones are:

1. THE NORTH CAROLINA-WEST VIRGINIA PARTNERSHIP.

This is an agreement between the N. C. and West Va. conventions to work together in the strengthening of Baptist work in West Va. The basic goal will be to double the number of Southern Baptist congregations in West Va. from the present 100 to 200 in 5 years. The population of West Va. is 1,800,000. Of this number, 1,250,000 are unchurched (70%). North Carolina Baptists will assist West Virginia Baptist with sponsorships, train leadership workers, send construction teams, summer missionaries, special ministry groups, etc.

- 2. Placed on the sales market for 6 months, the Baptist Building in Raleigh for a sales price of \$2,300,000.
- 3. Authorized the building of a BSU Student Center on the Pembroke Campus.
- 4. Will recommend to the Baptist State Convention in Greensboro in November a Cooperative Program Budget for 1981 of \$19,250,000.00, with the percentage breakdown of 35% for SBC and 65% for BSC.
- 5. Will recommend to BSC that Quota System for Trustees be eliminated.

## DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

Visitation and involvement in the churches, getting acquainted with our people, ministering in the Association and in other places, all have contributed to make this a very full and good year in the Lord.

I am pleased that all our Departments, except Music, had Workshops and other special meetings to help and bless our churches. I am thankful the the excellent, dedicated leadership who serve as Department Directors and

Committee Chairpersons.

It was my privilege to conduct 4 revivals, three in our Churches (Robbins, Lemon Springs, Ephesus) and one in Montgomery Association (Dover). I tried to keep abreast of all the materials and resources for our Weeks of Prayer - Association, State, Home and Foreign, and encourage our

people to give generously in support of these mission needs. In each mission emphasis, I was able to lead one or more Mission studies. Our Digest of Letters indicate that we increased in total mission gifts and gifts to the Cooperative Program and also in Baptisms and in Sunday School enrollment. Let us continue turning around the down-turn and go forward in all areas of ministry.

I led one WIN Clinic in the Association and one in the Association. Further, it was my privilege to teach and preach in several special emphases and to supply for our pastors and churches without pastors.

To keep up with mission concerns and to keep myself better prepared, I attended the Director of Missions Conference at Wingate, participated in the Orientation Conference for new Directors of Missions, and attended Home Missions Week at Ridgecrest. In preparation for the 1981 Churchmanship emphasis, I attended the Churchmanship Seminar at Camp Caraway.

In close cooperation with our Executive Committee and Associational Board, we have developed a well-balanced, challenging Calendar for the Association. I encourage our churches to use it. It is intended to strengthen and aid the local church in missions and ministry. I was pleased that 18 of our leaders participated in Key Leadership at Ridgecrest in May. That will

enable them to carry out better the goals of our Calendar.

One major area of concern is assisting our pastors with Continuing Education opportunities. Already we are providing some helpful six-hour seminars designed to help the pastor be a better minister. Such seminars set up include Conflict Management, Growing a Loving Church, Annual and Long-range Planning, Motivation, and Preaching. Our Baptist State Convention through George Shores and Burrel Lucas have greatly assisted in this project. May I thank you again for responding so graciously to the Open House for Cameron Home for Boys. Our ladies did an excellent job in preparing and serving refreshments and in being hosts to many distinguished guests. We will have other opportunities to share in this ministry which is part of our Children's Homes.

With the Missions Department, I have been involved in helping us develop a strong prison ministry. Robert Denton is serving as Chaplain for McCain Prison. He will work under the supervision of the Association, according to the new guidelines adopted. We are all eager to get on with the Furloughing Missionary Residence; much work has been done through committees already. Someday we hope to have "real live" missionaries living among us and available to all our churches for sharing missions.

Remember: 1981 is the Churchmanship Year; 1982 is the year for the Joint Evangelistic Crusade; and 1983 is the year for our World Missions

Conference. We are making preparation for these now.

I wish to thank Kathy Blackwell for her good service as Secretary-Treasurer this past year. Pray with me as we search for another part-time office secretary. Fleet Allen will serve us well as Treasurer. It's a joy to serve as your missionary!

#### INSTITUTIONS, AGENCIES AND BOARDS

#### ANNUITY BOARD

While serving Southern Baptist churches and agencies in 1979, the Annuity Board marked a period of "achievement, ministry, and growth in practically every phase of its work," according to Dr. Darold H. Morgan, President.

Key statistical highlights in 1979 included:

- 1. A 13th Check amounting to 10 percent of a year's benefit was mailed to most annuitants in December, 1979.
- 2. A total of \$19,131,539 in retirement benefits was paid.
- 3. Insurance benefits through the Board's church, agency, and seminary programs amounted to \$13,067,338.
- 4. Total assets held in trust at the close of the year equaled \$667,521,987. This figure represented a growth of \$97,787,516 over the 1978 total.
- 5. Premium income totaled \$69,548,849, including contributions and relief receipts. A total of \$35,348,300 was designated for the Fixed Fund investment plan, \$2,332,867 was earmarked for the Balanced Fund and \$12,121,729 went into Plan A. Insurance premiums totaled \$14,291,178.
- 6. At the close of 1979, the Board counted 22,879 church and agency member accounts in Plan A; 43,927 in the Fixed Fund investment plan; 4,934 in the Balanced Fund, and 3,941 in the Variable Fund.

Church will do well to provide retirement benefits for pastors and other staff.

#### BAPTIST HOSPITAL

During the past year, our hospital has again received accreditation for the maximum period, two years, by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. Only about one-third of the hospitals in the nation receive the full two-year accreditation.

Our hospital is constantly upgrading its staff, facilities, and equipment. In recent months, a carbon dioxide surgical laser has been added. The laser emits an invisible beam of light which vaporizes tissue, cutting and coagulating at the same time. It is used now for delicate surgery of the larynx, upper respiratory tract, and lung. It has potential, also, for surgery of other internal organs.

New ultrasound equipment provides improved accuracy in determining location and degree of blocked arteries. The department of dentistry is being expanded to meet an increasing need for specialty dental services. An occupational therapist has been added to the staff to help patients recover functional skills lost through accident or disease. A new instrument has been acquired for testing infants with suspected hearing loss.

The financial counseling section is now better prepared to assis those who need its services. Through a special arrangement with the Forameh County Social Services Department, social workers and a counselor for the state's Crippled Children's Program are now stationed in the hospital and

are immediately available to patients.

The staff and trustees continue to make every effort to keep operating costs as low as possible. In this connection, our hospital recently became a charter member of the Sun Alliance, an organization of 22 large hospitals in nine Southeastern states. A primary purpose of the alliance is to keep operating costs as low as possible through group purchasing of capital equipment, the development and sharing of comparative data and management information, and possible group arrangements with specialized consultants.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to provide a pastoral ministry to hospital patients and their families, individual and group counseling in crisis situations, clinical pastoral education at several levels, and numerous events in human enrichment and development. During the past year, the department has begun a Minister's Care Plan in which the Baptist State Convention provided financial assistance for ministers and/or their families who seek pastoral counseling through one of the department's regional centers. Also, the position of Chaplain to Medical Students has been elevated to a staff/faculty position.

Construction on the Focus Building, on the site of the Old Main Building which was torn down two years ago, is almost complete. Several departments of the Medical Center will be occupying this building in the

near future.

The hospital staff is grateful for the Baptist of North Carolina for continuing financial support. During 1979, the hospital received \$400,500 through the Cooperative Program and \$357,517 through the North Carolina Missions Offering and designated gifts.

#### BAPTIST FOUNDATION

This is the 60th birthday for the North Carolina Baptist Foundation. Chartered in 1920, it was born out of a need to provide a channel for gifts and bequests which would be held in trust. Thus, Baptist people were enabled to have a continuing part in support of every mission effort, every ministry of Baptists, even after their own deaths. Through these sixty years, your Baptist Foundation has received, administered, and distributed gifts to Baptist colleges, Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, foreign and home missions, state missions, Baptist Hospital, Churches, Associationa, the Cooperative Program. The Foundation receives no money for its own use - it only serves as trustee for all these Baptist causes.

Born of a bold idea, it fulfills its mission today giving each Baptist the

opportunity to be a part of Bold Missisons now - and forever!

The Foundation accepts gifts for Baptist causes in a variety of ways: (1) testamentary gifts, (2) gifts to support Baptist causes through charitable trusts.

In the coming year, the Foundation will continue to emphasize stewardship and commitment. Among major plans is the conducting of several seminars on estate planning for women. The Foundation Staff, its three consultants, board members, and legal and fiscal consultants are available for leading worship services, speaking to special groups or for special occasions and for private consultation and counsel.

#### BIBLICAL RECORDER

Faced with the same inflationary pressures that every family has these days, the RECORDER has managed to get through another year without an increase in subscription rates. A church can still send the RECORDER to resident families for only 7 cents a week per family, less than half the cost of a first-class stamp and the best bargain in Christian literature to be found anywhere. Thus the RECORDER is doing its best to held the line by

getting out a good paper at reaonsable cost.

It has been another newsworthy year for Baptists, and the RECORDER has stayed on top of all that's happening. At the State Convention last November in Winston-Salem, a new relationship between the convention and Wake Forest University was approved. Messengers who attended were well informed and the issue was settled without serious division or controversy. This is just one illustration of how the RECORDER informs North Carolina Baptist on vital matters affecting them. Nothing can take its place; certainly not the secular press which has so many denominations to cover.

Even though it was not a Baptist issue, the **RECORDER** was able to set the record straight on an anonymous petition being circulated about a film supposedly about "the Sex Life of Jesus." Not only did the **RECORDER** run news stories and editorials on this matter, it responded to numerous telephone calls. It was able to tell people the truth about something that never did take place - and the story was at least four years old anyhow.

Never has there been more misinformation circulated among our Baptist people. Those who do not receive the RECORDER are easy victims for all types of misleading stories and rumors. Add to this the deliverate efforts of some groups to siphon off the loyalties and money of the Baptist people and there's a strong case for sending the RECORDER to every church family. See that your family makes this move in the coming year.

## BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA

The Baptist Children's Home provides a ministry of Child Care and

family services.

During the past three years, members of the Board of Trustees and members of the administrative staff of the Homes completed an in-depth evaluation of the Institution's total program of services. We share three

significant statements from that report.

The advancement of this mission and ministry required (1) wise and resourceful leadership, (2) a well-trained and highly skilled staff who really care for children, (3) a carefully planned program of child care and family services, (4) appropriate physical facilities, (5) adequate funds and sound fiscal policy, and (6) the confidence and support of an informed and devotes constituency.

At this time, the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc. is in a position of strength. This strength comes ultimately from God and is discoverable in the committment, the competence and the faithful work of

His people engaged in this ministry.

This is not a time for complacency in child care and family services in North Carolina. It is a time for rigorous study, reflective planning, earnest prayer, and courageous action.

Progress is being made. Nine Family Services areas designated are as follow: Asheville, Charlotte, Thomasville, Kinston, Pembroke, Raleigh,

Hickory, Jacksonville, and Ahoskie.

Forty-five hundred people were affected in a significant way by Children's Home ministries. Fifteen hundred of these were children for whom you helped provide care and related services. While serving children and young people, work was being done with import adults in their lives.

Members of our Board of Trustee through various types of involvement and members of our staff, with your assistance, are dedicated to a continuing Christian ministry to children and members of their families.

#### CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

North Carolina Baptist stand tall in the area of Christian higher education. We support seven college and universities across our state whose purpose is to serve God and man be offering the best education possible to the people of our nation. These seven schools touch thousands of our youth and young people through the Christian witness of many of their students.

Our Baptist colleges see themselves as a valuable part of Christian missions. They operate out of the conviction that God's Holy Spirit leads persons to the discovery of the truth. Baptist young people are sought and welcomed by these schools. We should encourage our youth to enroll in one of our Baptist schools and give our support financially. We are in the process of shaping our tomorrows, and the youth of today are our leaders of tomorrow in the church, community, state, and nation. Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest, and Wingate need our support and prayers.

#### CHRISTIAN LIFE AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The events of the last year have dramatically highlighted the moral challenges of our day. The taking of the American hostages in Iran, the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, the resurgence of the Ku Klux Klan, recurring violence, worsening energy problems, the crisis in family life-all these speak to the need for a fresh word from the Lord for our day. During the year, the Christian Life Commission has been about tha task of trying to help Southern Baptists proclaim the Word with Clarity and power.

There have been some especially significant developments related to applied Christianity during the year. Executive Director Foy Valentine has been asked by the President of the United States to help define our national priorities by serving on the President's Commission for a National Agenda for the Eighties. Commission staff member, Harry N. Hollis, Jr., has had an important opportunity to contribute to the development of strengthened family life in America through his role as a member of the National Advisory Committee for the White House Conference on Families. A

national seminar was held in New York City, which dealt with "Ethical Issues for the Eighties," and conferences on "The Bible and Christian Ethics" were held at the summer assemblies at Ridgecrest and Glorieta. The Commission promoted the observance of World Hunger distributed hundreds of thousands of pieces of literature on current moral issues. Consultations were held dealing with the unresolved problem of television immporality and with the current crises in economics and energy. In addition, the Commission staff wrote articles for a large number of publications, preached sermons, led conferences, and gave speeches seeking to further reghteousness in our land. MORAL ALERT informs Southern Baptists about legislation which will affect morality in our society and it presents Christian ethical considerations of selected public issues.

The Commission has expanded the size, circulation, and frequency of publication of its periodical, LIGHT. LIGHT is mailed without charge to interested Southern Baptists; and it contains timely articles about the most

pressing moral issues of our day.

The Christian Life Commission is deeply concerned about the moral climate of our society, and seeks to work faithfully in the task of helping Southern Baptists in family life, race relations, economics and daily work, Christian citizenship development, and special moral concerns. The Christian Life Commission is grateful to God for the opportunity to work with Southern Baptists in this great responsibility of "helping changed people to change the world."

#### NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES

Ministry to an older person is a ministry as unto Christ Himself, and it is people like Mrs. Tillie Crabtree who make it all worth while. Mrs. Crabtree, a resident at Hayes Home who finds it very painful to walk, cam recently all the way from her room to the office of the Executive Director, Bill Poole, to say "Thank you" for all the blessings of the Baptist Homes to her as a resident and to give a personal gift of money to the Homes from her limited personal spending money as an expression of her gratitude to the Lord and

to North Carolina Baptists.

The ministry to older persons through our Baptist Homes is the youngest of all our social service ministries. We have just completed our 29th year of ministry and are moving with faith and gratitude into our 30th year and into the new decade of the eighties. We now have five areas of our state with special ministry - Resthaven, the Hayes Home, the Apartment Complex, and the Nursing Unit all in Winston Salem, and Homes in Albermarle, Hamilton, Yanceyville, and Asheville!. A dream was fulfilled when we moved into the new Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville in Marcy (1979) and have filled this beautiful new Home to the brim with 49 new residents who are a most welcome addition to our Baptist Homes family.

Through gifts, the Cooperative Program, and the new North Carolina

Missions Offering, we receive vital assistance with our ministries.

We are excited over the possibility of starting the construction of additional nursing beds in Winston-Salem to care for residents in the new Western North Carolina Home and the Apartment Complex when nursing care is needed for them. Hopefully, construction of these beds can be underway within this year, along with the construction of an urgently

needed enlargement and renovation of the Hayes Home, and the building of

a new administration building.

Each of our residents would have me thank you as North Carolina Baptists for all that you are, and for all that you do for them.


