Constitution

Of The

SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

(1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under the watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.

(3) Baptist churches affiliated with this association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.

(4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the association. The association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The association recognized that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the association shall be moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, parliamentarian, three (3)

trustees, and director of missions.

Section 2. Departments: The association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees: (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and By-laws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The director of missions and any other employees of the association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The association may amend or alter the constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this association shall be governed by the foregoing constitution and the following by-laws.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of **Robert's Rules of Order** where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its By-Laws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator:

(a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all

meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.

(b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

(c) Shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. Vice-Moderator: Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk:

(a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.

(c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.

(d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. Treasurer:

(a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.

(b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.

(c) Shall provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational newsletter each month.

(d) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. Historian: Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.

Section 6. Parliamentarian: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. Trustees: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association of Associational Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

(a) Search Committee:

1. The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

(b) Conditions of Employment:

1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.

2. Shall have 3 weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.

3. May be away from the Association for 3 weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.

4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.

5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed 5 Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.

6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c) Duties:

1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.

2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.

3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.

5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.

6. Shall be alert to the needs for mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.

7. Shall be an ex-officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.

(b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

(a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.

(b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

(a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.

(c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

(a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.

(b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.

(c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

(a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

(a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audio-visual aid materials and equipment.

(b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

(a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women, and girls in the support of the total program of the church.

(c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

(a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.

(b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.

(c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.

(d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.

(e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
- (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the Association.
- (c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
- (e) The President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meetings to the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastor's Conference. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as Chairperson of this Committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed, recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven

members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational Budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and By-laws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-laws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services or services or ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BY-LAWS

The Association may amend or alter the By-laws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change

or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

of the Thirty-Second Annual Session Sandhills Baptist Association

October 19, 1981 - Fairview Baptist Church

Night Session

The Thirty-second Annual Session of the Sandhills Baptist Association was opened at the Fairview Baptist Church, October 19, 1981 at 7:00 p.m.

1. The Moderator, Lee Proctor, called the meeting to order.
2. The hymn, "Standing on the Promises," was sung. Eldon Hinegardner led in devotion from Isaiah 1:18-20, "Coming Together to Reason."
3. Lee Proctor welcomed messengers and visitors.
4. J. Billy Graham introduced new pastors Eldon Hinegardner, Calvary, Allen Schuyler, Carthage, and Don Hays, Red Branch, Interim pastors, Robert Wilson, Ephesus, and Paul Nickens, West End.
5. The Order of Service as presented by John Stone was adopted as printed.
6. J. Billy Graham gave the Director of Missions Report. The Report was adopted with the recommendation that the World Missions Conference be changed from September, 1983 to October 30 - November 6; Pee Dee Association would cooperate with Sandhills, and Pee Dee would have from Wednesday - Sunday.
7. David Poteat gave the Sunday School Report.
8. Wayne Adams presented the Church Training Report.
9. Deborah Richardson gave the Music Report and announced that there would be Music Workshop during the coming year.
10. In the absence of Roy Little, J. Billy Graham encouraged participation and preparation for the 1982 "Here's Hope" Simultaneous Crusade in April, Evangelism Report was adopted as printed.
11. During miscellaneous business Benny Maness gave the Credentials Report. The messengers from the Middle Cross Baptist Church were recognized and the church commended for its progress.
12. John Stone introduced Rev. Tony Brewington who presented the Jacobs family of the Burnt Swamp Association who brought a most inspirational message in song and word.
13. J. Billy Graham introduced Herman Hayes, Foreign Mission Board Staff member, who brought a very challenging missionary message from 1 John 4:14, emphasizing four truths: (1) Son sent to be the Savior, (2) We have witnessed it, (3) The World needs to hear, and (4) The responsibility rests on us.
14. Lee Proctor called the session to adjournment, with James Cagle giving the Benediction.

**October 20, 1981 - Ives Memorial Baptist Church
Afternoon Session**

1. Lee Proctor called the meeting to order and recognized all visitors and messengers.
2. With Deborah Richardson at the piano, Lee Proctor led in the

singing of "Praise Him, Praise Him." Paul Nickens brought an inspirational devotion from Luke 10:38-42, expressing the need for salvation, the need for ministering to Jesus, and the need to trust and have communion with Jesus, and leading in prayer for God's guidance and blessing during the session.

3. Gary Hudson gave the Youth and Campus Ministry Report with an amendment correcting the date for the Youth Winter Celebration from Feb. 14 to Feb. 26.

4. Faye Boroughs presented the WMU Report, with one change in printed report, stating that the annual leadership conference was held at Pleasant Hill September 22, and not Taylor Memorial.

5. Gene Booker gave the Stewardship Report, encouraging churches to contribute a minimum of 3% to Associational ministries.

6. Bob Morrison gave the Brotherhood Report for Lane Hall.

7. The Senior Adult Report was adopted as printed.

8. Bobbie Booker presented the Library/Media Report, and expressed thanks for the excellent leadership of Daphne Leonard.

9. Eugene Payne gave the Missions Report for Max Gilmore.

10. The Prison Ministry Report was adopted as printed.

11. Gene Booker shared information on Christian Higher Education, and encouraged support of our colleges and universities.

12. Tom Barnes introduced Calvin Knight, Baptist Hospital Denominational Representative, who spoke on North Carolina missions and ministries, with particular emphasis on the ministry of the Baptist Hospital.

13. Mrs. G.P. Jones led in an inspirational Memorial Service, giving loving tribute to brothers and sisters who had gone on to be with the Lord during the past year.

14. During Miscellaneous Business Eugene Payne gave a brief Ordination Council Report, stating that the Council had examined Sherril Dunn of Middle Cross and Oscar Logwood of Pleasant Hill for the Gospel Ministry.

15. J. Billy Graham recognized: (1) Don Hays, new Red Branch pastor, (2) Mrs. Steve Gilmore and the Beulah Hill Baptist Church for designing the winning sketch for the Associational Flag to be carried at the State Convention in Greensboro, and (3) Nita Jaite, who announced the upcoming conference on ministry to the Deaf and Blind to be held at Aberdeen, November 19. Messengers were requested to fill in the evaluation form in the back of the Book of Reports and give suggestions for the 1982 annual session.

16. Jesse Mansfield read Acts 26:1-23 and led in prayer.

17. David Poteat preached a challenging message on the subject, "Faithful to the Task." He pointed out that the church (1) Has a voice, (2) Let the world know who the church is, (3) Help the world to know the purpose of the church, and (4) Proclaim the Gospel to bring conviction upon the world.

3. There was no miscellaneous business, and no changes in the Constitution and By Laws. No report necessary.

4. Curtiss Bettini presented the Nominations Committee Report. There were no further nominations, so all officers were elected as given.

5. Robert Cooke gave the Committee on Committee Report. Committees were elected as presented.

6. Dr. Fleet Allen gave the Treasurer's Report. Dr. Fleet Allen answered Bobbie Booker's question on Special Gifts item, stating that the Missionary Residence contributions were included in that amount. Report adopted.

7. Jack Hartsell presented the Budget, prepared by the Finance and Budget Committee, and recommended by the Association Board. The Budget was adopted.

8. Richard Hopkins gave the Place and Preacher Report. In 1983 the Association will meet with Pine Grove, October 17, 7:00 p.m. and Aberdeen First, October 18, 4:00 p.m. Richard Hopkins will deliver the annual sermon, with James Cagle as alternate.

9. After corrections on two figures and a statement about the Budget of the Baptist State Convention, the Report from General Board Representative, Charles Hinson, was adopted.

10. A motion was made to adjust the program time to bring back on schedule. Carried.

11. Lee Proctor recognized Diane Maxwell, member of Ives Memorial, winner of the Association and State Youth Bible Drill and presented Diane with an award.

12. Lee Proctor recognized Vee Proctor and presented her with a corsage for outstanding service, patience and understanding during the term as moderator's wife. Lee Proctor recognized Anne Graham and presented her with a corsage and commended her for outstanding service as the wife of the Director of Missions.

13. Bill Bost presented the Report for the Resolutions Committee.

14. Lee Proctor recognized Jim Saul who extended greetings from the Baptist Homes for the Aging.

15. Anne Graham led in the Installation of Officers and Teachers for 1981-1982, challenging each Officer to be faithful, fruit bearing Christians in carrying out their responsibilities in the Association, and presented each with a pear as a symbol of the waiting harvest and in appreciation for their willing labor as God's servant. Pledge of Commitment was repeated. Robert Wilson led in the prayer of dedication.

16. Dr. Corbin Cooper, Baptist State Convention Cooperative Ministries Director, showed slides on the different thrusts for the "Here's Hope" Crusade and challenged all churches to participate in the 1982 Revivals.

17. Lee Proctor gave the gavel to Lee Rorie and recognized him as moderator elect. The new moderator led the congregation in singing "Let Others See Jesus in You."

18. Lee Rorie recognized Corbin Cooper who introduced Dr. Charles Ward, Pastor, First Baptist Church, Baptist General Convention, who brought the closing message, following the beautiful music selections by the Association Choir that was led by Deborah Richardson.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

In many ways this has been a good year for Sandhills. With our strong emphases on evangelism and missions we have almost doubled our Baptisms and the number of persons received by letter. There were increases in the Cooperative Program, and Grand Total Missions Expenditures. We will need to give more attention to Sunday School Outreach.

Every Department conducted at least one workshop or conference; in some cases more than one training event or rally was sponsored. Every committee served well. I am most grateful to all our Associational leadership and our office secretary, Mrs. Cindy Priest, and Treasurer, Dr. Fleet Allen.

Eight of our churches conducted lay led revivals with good results. We participated with Black Baptists in Interpretation Meetings for the 1982 Simultaneous Revival Crusade April 4-18. Seminars to train our people in Prayer, People Search, and Lay Witness were held. Preparation for the Crusade continues.

My wife and I enjoyed teaching several mission studies among our churches on the Association, State ministries, Home and Foreign Missions. I enjoyed preaching three revivals, assisting in several training sessions with church groups, such as deacon ministry. Working with our Missions Department we are seeking ways to minister to Migrants, Disables (Deaf, Blind, etc.), Resort communities and to encourage Non affiliated Baptist Churches to join with us in the 1982 Revival, and to consider cooperation with Sandhills Baptists. We hope that in addition to helping start new churches in West Virginia through Mountain State 200, we can also begin some new mission where needed here.

I am seeking to help our pastors with Continuing Education through sponsoring Seminars dealing with areas of pastoral ministry.

We rejoice that four of our churches now have strong pastors since our last annual meeting: Calvary, Carthage, Red Branch, and Pineywood called good pastors this year. Also, we are grateful for leadership of Godly men who live among us and serve as Interim Pastors: Rev. Paul Nickens serves West End First Baptist and Rev. Robert Wilson serves Ephesus. I have met with several of our pastor Selection Committees, and some other committees, with special areas of need.

This is the YEAR OF THE CHURCHMAN. We are all called to be devoted disciples of our Lord and to be faithful to His church. To this end we conducted a Churchmanship Seminar four evenings in four hosts churches. I encourage every church to: (1) Participate wholeheartedly in the Simultaneous Revival crusade next April, and (2) To decide now to take part in the WORLD MISSIONS CONFERENCE, October, 1983. We recommend a change of the date in September to October 30, November 6, 1983. It is a joy to serve Christ with you.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

During the past year the General Board has met quarterly and the General Board Executive Committee has met monthly. From the General Board I was elected to serve on the Executive Committee and named Chairman of the Council on Social Services.

The General Board is recommending the 1982 Baptist State Convention Budget to be \$20,500,000. The NCMO goal for 1981-82 is \$2,750,000. Funds in excess of this offering goal will go toward renovation of buildings at Ft. Caswell and to assist with Mountain State 200, the mission project to help West Virginia Baptists start 100 new missions and churches by 1985.

There was a called General Board meeting during the year held at Camp Caraway for the purpose of acting on a proposal to sell the Baptist Building in Raleigh, and to relocate to another site in Raleigh. However, due to circumstances that developed, the recommendation to agree to sell was not able to materialize. Five proposals regarding the Baptist Building will be presented to the Baptist State Convention in Greensboro in November.

This year David Langford has been elected by the General Board to serve as Brotherhood Director, and Bob Goode has come to serve in the Sunday School Department. Evangelism Director position is still open.

The General Board encourages support of Here's Hope Crusade 1982, cooperating with General Baptist State Convention, Inc.

BROTHERHOOD

Our department exists to assist our churches with missions education and training to encourage involvement of men and boys in local missions and missions around the world.

We conducted a workshop to assist Baptist Men and RA leadership, with several leaders taking part.

In August, 65 men and boys participated in the Baptist Men's Rally held at Carthage. Bob Morrison gave an inspiring devotional. Rev. Eldon Hinegardner and two laymen from Calvary testified as to how the lay led revival had blessed their church with many professions of faith. Lane Hall have a slide presentation of the building of the new church at McCook Lake, South Dakota. Rev. J. Billy Graham challenged the group to be ambassadors for Christ in a day when Bold Mission commitment and involvement are required. A watermelon cutting was enjoyed following the program.

The effort to raise funds and to send laymen to South Dakota was most successful. Over \$1,000.00 was raised by five of our churches. During two weeks the new McCook Lake Baptist Church building was erected and strong evangelistic witness and preaching were shared.

Locally, Baptist men from our churches are involving themselves in prison ministries at McCain and at Carthage, and at the Youth Centers and at Sammarkand. In the Association, eight lay-led revivals were conducted this year, assisted by the Baptist State Convention Brotherhood Department and the Lay Witness Foundation.

Churches, pastors, individuals are encouraged to help with Mountain State 200 - a missions endeavor by West Virginia Baptists and North Carolina Baptists to start 100 new missions and churches by 1985. Needs include preaching, witnessing, taking community survey, Backyard Bible Clubs, music groups, construction (labor electrical, carpentry, masonic, etc.), materials, and monetary gifts. Contact Lane Hall or the Director of Missions to help meet the needs.

We are pleased that Jack Robinson has agreed to become Associational RA Director again. We are looking forward to a good year with Baptist Men and RA work.

CHURCH TRAINING

Emphasis will be placed on Equipping Centers, Bible Drill and Speakers' Tournament, along with an inspirational message. All churches are encouraged to attend.

Another important date to remember is October 26-27, at which time the Convention Church Training staff will lead a workshop for all churches with or without Church Training programs - to learn the value of this vital phase of church work. Pastors and Church training Directors should begin planning for workers in all age groupings and those responsible for new member training and Church Leader Training to be present.

For 1982 we hope to make available to churches a consultant from the Church Training Department, Ruth Prince, to work with churches who are interested in developing church training programs. Details will be worked out as the year progresses.

LIBRARY SERVICES

A media center ministry is valuable to a church as it seeks to worship God, to educate its members, to minister to the needs of the people, and to proclaim the gospel. To help provide adequately trained leaders and users, training opportunities in 1981 were:

1. Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest in May, attended by TACMO President.

2. State Conference in Greensboro, Attended by TACMO President.

3. Two Library workers attended Library Conference at Ridgecrest in July.

4. A training session was held at Carthage in August.

5. Eleven library workers representing 7 churches, attended library training session held during Key Leadership Conference at Carthage.

6. A training session was held at Bethlehem Church during the Sunday School workshop.

Another training opportunity is offered during Church Training Leadership training conference at Carthage, October 26-27, 1981.

In the Association five churches have church libraries. Lemon Springs, Bethlehem, Ives Memorial, and Vass have started libraries this year. Among the churches with libraries include Aberdeen, Southern Pines, Carthage, Cameron, and Taylor Memorial. Robbins is reactivating their library.

Goals for 1982 include: (1) Start three new church libraries, (2) Participate in training opportunities in Raleigh, and in our Association during Spring and Fall of 1982, (3) Leaders attend State Library Conference.

6. The Director and three (3) of the Missions Committee attended the Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest, May 1981.

Future plans call for the possibility of establishing additional preaching points in our Associational area. The population of our County is growing at a rapid pace and there's a need for new work in order to maintain an effective witness for the Lord.

It is hoped that each church in our Association will set up a Missions Committee to assist in identifying and evaluating mission needs in their own area. Your Associational Missions Department stands ready to assist in this work in any way possible. Our goal is to reach the unchurched and unsaved with the Good News of the Gospel.

PRISON MINISTRY REPORT

Our Prison Ministry at McCain Correctional Department is now in its eleventh year. Until 1980 the work was under the supervision of the Chaplaincy and Language Ministries Department of our State Baptist Convention. Our work is now under the supervision of our local Sandhills Association. This brings the work closer home and provides closer supervision. Also it provides an opportunity for enlistment of laymen volunteers. At present we have three laymen working with us each Saturday. We are now providing two services each Saturday. One for the General Population and one for those in Protective Custody.

Since January 1, 1981 we have held 46 worship services, made 51 visits, held 50 counseling sessions, 21 professions of faith, and distributed over 1600 tracts and periodicals. In 1981 we acquired fifty new hymnals, a piano, and a communion set. Our goal for 1981-82 is to purchase a portable baptistry.

These purchases were made by contributions from those interested in the prison ministry.

INSTITUTIONS AGENCIES AND BOARDS

Annuity Board

"Nineteen hundred eighty has been a year of unprecedented growth and startling change," according to Dr. Darold H. Morgan, president of the Southern Baptist Convention's Annuity Board.

Key statistical highlights in 1980 included:

1. A 13th Check amounting to 10 percent of a year's benefit was mailed to Annuitants who retired before 1980.
2. A total of \$21,059,479 in retirement benefits was paid.
3. Insurance benefits through the Board's church, agency and seminary programs amounted to \$15,955,965.
4. Total assets held in trust at the close of the year equal \$806,518,757. This figure represented a growth of \$139,043,770 over 1979's total.
5. Premium income totaled \$87,938,590, including contributions and relief receipts. A total of \$42,121,138 was designated for the Fixes Fund, \$3,620,501 was earmarked for the Balanced Fund and \$1,063,513 went into Plan A. Insurance premiums totaled \$24,863,894.
6. At the close of 1980, the Board counted 20,527 church and agency member accounts in Plan A, 47,701 in the Fixed Fund, 6,033 in the Balanced Fund and 3,376 in the Variable Fund.

In Sandhills Association 20 Churches and 22 staff members are participating in the retirement program. Of this number, seven are still participating on the minimum of \$33.34 per month. There is a great need to upgrade this to 10% of total salary for staff members.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to provide a pastoral ministry to hospital patients and their families, individual and group counseling in crisis situations, clinical pastoral education at several levels, and numerous events in human enrichment and development. There is a Ministers Care Plan that seeks to minister to Ministers and families who need pastoral care.

The hospital staff is grateful for North Carolina Baptists for continuing financial support. The Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering contribute to the Hospital.

Baptist Foundation

N.C. Baptist Foundation is a trustee agency of N.C. Baptist State Convention, the only incorporated trust agency serving all institutions, causes and concerns of N.C. Baptist. It receives and manages gifts and bequests for the benefit of all Baptist undertakings in North Carolina as well as for Southern Baptist Convention agencies, Board and causes. It assists individuals and families in estate planning the operation and administrative costs are funded by the Cooperative Program gifts.

During the past year, twenty-three new trust funds valued at \$385,016 were established with the N.C. Baptist Foundation. Coupled with the additions to existing trust, total new assets held for the various missions and institutions increased the value of trust assets by \$453,877.

More families are utilizing the memorial gifts as a means of providing mission support on a continuing basis. Individual trust accounts are established with only the income being distributed in the name of the deceased family member. Generally the mission cause named to receive the income was loved and supported during the lifetime of the family member.

Many of God's stewards wish to provide for continuing support of Baptist work. It is in the area of estate stewardship that the Foundation best serves Baptists and others.

Biblical Recorder

Again this past year, the Biblical Recorder has reminded us all of the value of good church pastor relations. This is just one of many subjects the Recorder seeks to cover for N.C. Baptists.

The editor believes strongly in the local church as well as the ministry and work of the pastor. As all of us know, nothing can take the place of a good church and a good pastor.

And yet, we also know that there are those in our midst who do not believe in this as much as they should. The Recorder is a constant reminder to us that a bedrock of Baptist life is a strong local church served by dedicated pastor.

The Recorder also challenged us in many other ways. For example, it reported that there was a net gain of only 21 new churches in our convention in the past 10 years. This shocked many people, especially in view of the number of new churches organized in the last 50 years and in the population growth of our state in the last decade.

The Recorder was happy to report that the Southern Baptist Convention in Los Angeles was a good one. Those unable to attend were given an accurate and complete picture of what happened there - a front row seat, as it were, for only 7¢ (cost of one Recorder).

When people know the truth - and truth must be spoken in love - we have a better convention, better churches, better associations and better individual Christians. The Recorder is that instrument of communication that keeps us closer together as Baptists.

Baptist Children's Home

Baptist Children's Home ministry continues to grow. The Thomasville Family Services Center ministers to residents of 28 counties, there is a group care at Mills Home, a specialized group home at Wall Home, Wallburg, emergency care at High Point and Burlington, a network of licensed foster homes therapeutic camping in Moore County, social services offices in Hickory, Thomasville and Burlington, and Child Development Center and Family Resource Center in Thomasville plus counseling and referral services.

An amphitheater was completed at Mills Home campus by the Alumni Association. The therapeutic camping program of the Institution has been consolidated to make use of the Cameron Home near Vass.

Good things are taking place in our Baptist Children's Homes across the State. Six Family Service Centers have been opened with three other in planning stages. Children are being provided temporary care in Seven Emergency Care homes. The Child Development Center in Thomasville continues to offer progressive demonstration preschool care as a model for North Carolina Baptist Churches. The Family Resource Center located in Thomasville is piloting a concept of continuing education for people across the State who are in the best position to assist families through a concept of the preventive care.

Appreciation is expressed for continuing financial support through special gifts, the North Carolina Missions Offering and income through the Cooperative Program. In the words of Paul, "We are laborers together with God" (I Corinthians 3:9).

Homes for the Aging

As we look back over the past thirty years of ministry in our Baptist Homes, it is a real inspiration to see where we have been and to meditate on the many blessings that God has so richly bestowed upon us. He has brought us from one home in 1951 to a total of six Homes, an apartment complex, and a skilled nursing unit; from one resident to a total capacity for 300 persons in 1981.

Quite frankly, we are at a standstill. Crippling inflation has caught up with us and is eating into the very vitals of our existance. We are still giving the same high quality of Christian care to each of the residents in the six Home, Nursing Care Unit and the apartment complex. It is a struggle and a juggle between income and expenditures.

Building plans for a desperately needed 70-bed addition to our current Nursing Care Unit and the Hayes Home have been held up by regulatory red tape for years. Now that the state health laws have been altered to permit the building of these beds, it doesn't appear that we could wisely borrow the money at the current interest rate.

Though 1980 gifts through our Copperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering are a little more than \$550,000, these gifts are not commensurate with our current population growth and the ministry support needs of the Homes.

Two things are apparent. One, Baptists must be informed of our needs and do all possible to increase their gifts accordingly through the regular channels - the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering. Two, N.C. Baptist must help us find ways of raising money for the development and expansion to meet the needs of the current residents and the needs of growing numbers of older adults.

The General Board of the Baptist State Convention has joined us in our concerns and has appointed a Special Study Committee to take a serious and close look at the financial needs of our Baptist Homes.

We will continue to trust our Heavenly Father for his blessings upon the Homes' vital ministry to older adults. We will keep faith with Him and with N.C. Baptist and strive to give the highest quality care to each resident of

the N.C. Baptist Homes. We will believe that our future is as bright as the promises of God himself and as sure as the love and devotion of N.C. Baptists.

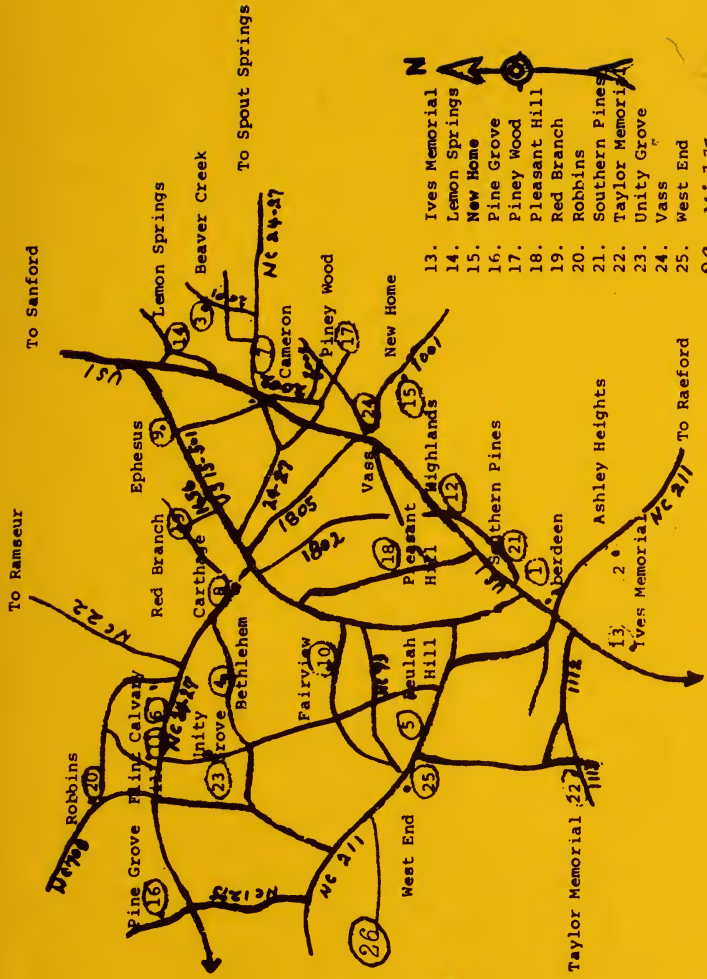

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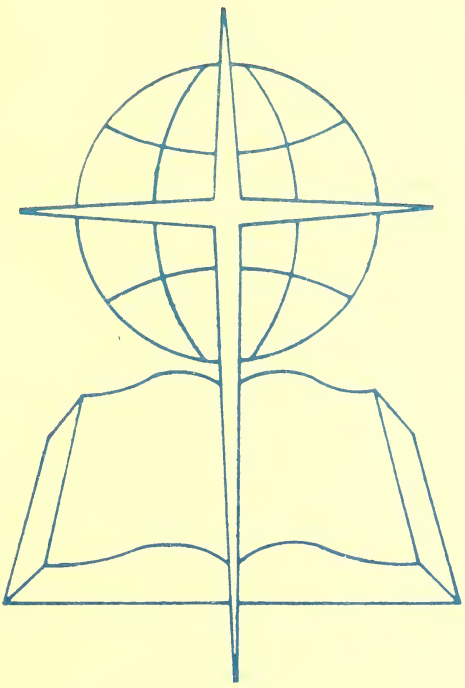

Constitution

Of The

SANDHILLS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors, of the affiliated churches and their missions and other fulltime paid professional staff.

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

(1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under the watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.

(3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee, and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.

(4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the association. The association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The association recognized that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV — MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the association shall be moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, parliamentarian, three (3) trustees, and director of missions.

Section 2. Departments: The association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees: (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and By-Laws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The director of missions and any other employees of the association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The association may amend or alter the constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this association shall be governed by the foregoing constitution and the following by-laws.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its By-Laws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator:

(a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.

(b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

(c) Shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. Vice-Moderator: Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk:

(a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.

(c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.

(d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. Treasurer:

(a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.

(b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.

(c) Shall provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational newsletter each month.

(d) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. Historian: Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.

Section 6. Parliamentarian: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. Trustees: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association of Associational Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

(a) Search Committee:

1. The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

(b) Conditions of Employment:

1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.

2. Shall have 3 weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.

3. May be away from the Association for 3 weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.

4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.

5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed 5 Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.

6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c) Duties:

1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.

2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.

3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.

5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.

6. Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.

7. Shall be an ex-officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE III – DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.

(b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

(a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.

(b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

(a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.

(c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

(a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.

(b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.

(c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

(a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7: Stewardship Promotion:

(a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audio-visual aid materials and equipment.

(b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

(a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women, and girls in the support of the total program of the church.

(c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

(a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.

(b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.

(c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.

(d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.

(e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

(a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.

(b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE IV – COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

(a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.

(b) The officers of the Association.

(c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.

(d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.

(e) The President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meetings to the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council,

and Pastor's Conference. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as Chairperson of this Committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the Committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed, recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this Committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs.

It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and By-Laws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and

fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services or services or ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BY-LAWS

The Association may amend or alter the By-laws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

EVENING SESSION

The thirty-third annual session of the Sandhills Baptist Association was called to order by Moderator Lee Rorie, October 18, 1982, at the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church.

1. Gene Booker led in singing the hymn, "Blessed Assurance." Joe Waterson gave the devotion from Matthew 17:14ff and led in prayer.

2. The moderator welcomed the messengers and visitors, totaling 184, and expressed appreciation to Pleasant Hill Church for serving graciously as host church.

3. The Director Missions recognized new ministers, Rick Downing, Pastor, Beaver Creek, and Willie Bryant, Faith Baptist. Glen Hancock has been called to Ephesus, effective November 1. Four interim pastors recognized: Robert Wilson, Ephesus; Joe Watterson, Fairview; and Paul Nickens, West End; Richard Hopkins, Taylor Memorial.

4. The Program Chairman, Roy Little, moved the adoption of the Order of Service as printed, with additions (1) Credentials Committee and (2) Representative from Cameron-Morrison Female Facility. Motion passed.

5. Rev. Bennie Maness gave the Credentials Report, welcoming Middle Cross Baptist Church into full fellowship and Faith Baptist Church under the watchcare. In adoption of the Report everyone stood in extending a warm welcome.

6. J. Billy Graham gave the Director of Missions Report expressing appreciation for generous support and encouraging participation in the Sunday School Enlargement Campaign, March 1983, and the World Missions Conference, October 1983.

7. Lee Proctor gave the Sunday School Report, focusing on the Sunday School Enlargement Campaign, March 1983.

8. Wayne Adams gave the Church Training Report, urging increasing use of the many training resources available to Southern Baptists.

10. Don Hays presented the Evangelism Report, encouraging greater concern for lost people and urging more of our people to be personal witnesses for Jesus.

11. Miss Nancy Lowe, Superintendent, Cameron-Morrison Female Facility, shared information about the people in that institution and requested assistance in ministering to their spiritual needs. There is need for a chapel and for a service conducted by a chaplain. Yokefellows help minister there.

16. Rev. Roy Little, host pastor, was called upon by the moderator to close the session with the benediction.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

September 1 marked the beginning of my fourth year as your Director of Missions. I am grateful for the generous support and love from our churches, and the good cooperation from our Associational leadership. Our Moderator, Lee Rorie; Treasurer, Fleet Allen; Clerk, Dewitt Purvis, Office Secretary, Mrs. Delia Gray; and each other officer have been most helpful in our work together. It is a privilege to serve our Lord with you.

Bold Missions Thrust can and must become a reality. It is a fresh challenge to New Testament Christianity. Our three major emphases in 1982-85 are (1) Reaching People, (2) Developing Believers, and (3) Strengthening Families.

New Work will be a major thrust this year. In the Spring we will study about New Work. Each church can grow by discovering ministry needs. A new unit can be started in an organization. An area can be surveyed, and a mission can be started where there is a need.

Our Missions Department will help us discover areas of need. We will look into possibilities in the resort Communities, such as Whispering Pines, Pinehurst, Foxfire, and Seven Lakes. Our Resort Seminar conducted in September helped us with some principles in ministering to affluent people among us. Further, we are in the process of preparing an attractive, informative brochure to mail to families in these communities.

Two major events that will help our churches reach out to people and do world missions are (1) the Sunday School Enlargement Crusade in March, and the (2) World Missions Conference in October, 1983. Every church can grow by expanding the Sunday School. Twenty-four of our churches are committed to participating in the World Missions Conference! Praise God.

The Here's Hope Crusade claimed much of our energies and time this year. We did extensive preparation, conducted clinics and seminars on lay-witness training, prayer, and follow up. Some churches did People Search projects. Baptists over the State gained a great deal of favorable media coverage. Our Evangelism Department gives the report of additions by Baptism and by Letter. Let us continue spreading the message of hope this year. Meeting the approval of our people, we hope to conduct an area-wide crusade in 1984.

We are making every effort to improve the quality of work from our office. As we update our office machines, we are able to do better work. We prepared a 16 month Calendar for pastors and church councils that will give Associational, State, and SBC dates.

This year I wrote letters to non-affiliated Baptist churches and invited them to consider fellowship and affiliation with Sandhills. I hope that some will look upon this invitation with favor.

Special mission ministries such as Prisons, Migrants, Blind, Deaf, Disabled, are in evidence in our area. We are seeking to increase our ministries to these people. Rev. Robert Denton serves well in Prison Chaplaincy. Mrs. Nita Jaite is helping us with other special ministry. I commend our churches for sensitivity and increasing offerings to World Hunger needs. Seminary Extension is a possibility; our Seminary Study Committee will make a recommendation sometime this year on this work.

Every Department conducted at least one seminar or workshop, and in some cases, a rally, or other type of inspirational meeting or fellowship. I enjoyed teaching State, Home, and Foreign mission studies, and preaching in our churches. Anne joins me in sharing in teaching missions. Continue to pray for our churches seeking pastors. May 1982-83 lead us to greater service for our Lord.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

During the past year the General Board of the Baptist State Convention has convened three times with the January and September meeting held at Caraway Conference Center and the May meeting on the campus of Meredith College. The Executive Committee has convened for ten sessions. During the past two years I have had the responsibility of serving as President of the Council on Christian Social Services and on the Executive Committee.

The past year has been a good year for the General Board. Among the more significant actions has been that of completing the sale of the Baptist Building on Hillsborough St. in Raleigh, and beginning the construction of the new building in the Cary suburb. The new building is scheduled for completion by January, 1983. Other actions of particular importance has been that of selecting J. W. Hutchins, Jr., of Virginia to be the new Director of the Division of Evangelism. Also, the General Board appointed a Convention Format Study Committee to study the present format of the annual session and bring recommendations for future conventions. From this committee will come recommendations to the Convention meeting in Fayetteville that a five-year cycle be started, allowing extensive reporting of four divisions of work each year for the next five years. It will also be recommended that the annual meeting be extended to include six sessions rather than the present five, with Tuesday afternoon be given as free time allowing for alumni meetings, etc.

The General Board will recommend to the convention that the 1983 budget be \$22,250,000. The 1983 NCMO goal is \$2,750,000.

This completes my four years as the Sandhills Association representative on the General Board. I appreciate the opportunity to serve in your behalf. Mr. Fleet Allen is the nominee for the next four year term. Let us remember to give him our support and prayers during his tenure as our representative.

BROTHERHOOD

In Baptist Men and Boys work we are emphasizing mission education, mission action in the community, state and other places in our world.

In Bold Mission Thrust emphases we are encouraging involvement of laymen in evangelism helping start and undergird new work.

During the second week of August, 1982, five men - two pastors and three laymen from four of our churches (Aberdeen, Carthage, Red Branch, and Southern Pines) - went to Old Fields, West Va., on a church construction project. Four of the men did construction work on the church building and one worked with the local pastor in visitation ministry. Sandhill churches are encouraged to send members to help build new churches in West Virginia with Mt. State 200 projects through 1985.

In January, several of our churches observed Baptist Men's Day.

In February, Lemon Springs Church was host to our Baptist Men's Rally. Rev. Robert Denton and two laymen from Ashley Heights and two prison laymen shared an inspiring program on prison ministry. Lane Hall brought us up to date on Mt. State 200 - a mission effort involving North Carolina Baptists with West Va. Baptists, to build 100 new churches by 1985.

In September, a Regional Baptist Men's Workshop was conducted at Aberdeen for leadership in Baptist men and RA's. State and national leaders led the workshop with several of our leaders attending.

Jack Robinson, our association RA Leader, served us well again this year. Five churches had representatives in the RA Crusader Derby in October. Several churches had boys in the RA Field Day in April at Pinecrest. Churches that desire to have a RA Basketball Team should contact Jack Robinson or David Marks, Aberdeen Church.

CHURCH TRAINING

The purpose of Church Training is to equip church members and leaders to be more effective witnesses for Christ. We continue to make progress as more churches are using Equipping Centers, special training materials and other sources provided through the CT Department. Successful events for 1982 include "M" Night at Bethlehem Church and the Youth Bible Drill, which included two participants from Ives Memorial Church. We also had well-attended conferences for the emphases programs in 1982. For the first time in many years, there is a full team of associational leaders to assist churches in establishing and maintaining effective training programs. We will be conducting training workshops for all those involved in this phase of church work and encourage pastors, directors, and leaders to take advantage of these training opportunities. We also expect to see an increase in the participation of children's and Youth Bible Drill and the Youth Speakers' Tournament.

The Church Training Department of the Baptist State Convention is eager to assist the Association as well as individual churches in developing an ongoing program to train them for the task. Continue to pray for the

associational team as we work to have CT programs in every church in our association.

EVANGELISM

Each year throughout our state, conferences on evangelism have been held. Training courses, workshops, and seminars abound in every association. Missions have been organized, counselors trained, and tone of literature on evangelism has been written and distributed to local churches. Yet we continue to see a downward trend in professions and baptisms in almost all churches.

It has been reported in a booklet "North Carolina People", published and put out by the State Baptist Convention, that while our state was growing, while ethnic populations were increasing, while new residents were moving into our area from all over the world, we the churches baptized 9 percent fewer people in 1980 and 81 than we did in 1970. In 1973, approximately 32,000 people were baptized compared to 23,000 in 1981. It is estimated that at least 35 percent of North Carolina's population has not even a casual relationship with any church at all. Sunday School enrollment across the convention dropped 9 percent also, and Church Training in 1981 dropped 46 percent.

More County has grown during that time from 39,048 population in 1970, to 50,505 in 1980. Increase in total population, but decrease in church enrollment.

Never before, has there been the need for our churches and their people to share the "Good News" with personal evangelism. The picture may look dismal, but the "Cross Of Christ" has never been brighter. In his book "One Way to Change the World", Leighton Ford wrote, "It has been estimated that in spite of the combined efforts of all churches and evangelistic and missionary agencies put together, it is taking 1,000 Christians an average of 365 days to win one person to Christ." If this is true, we must ask ourselves, why? Why are we not reaching more people for Christ? We cannot fault our training. We have better tools to work with than ever before. What then is the answer?

The answer is to found in the individual Christian. Until each Christian is willing to pick up their individual cross and deny self then all our conferences, seminars, and our revivals will have been totally in vain. Now is the time to put feet to our training and words, and decide that we the individual Christian must go and tell "The Good News". Let this be the year when we work together to see the vision of 8.5 by 85 become a reality.

Jesus said, "Even so it is not the will of your Father which is in heaven, that one of these little ones should perish." Matthew 18:14.

In October, 1981, several of the churches within the association conducted a "Peoples Search Campaign" in preparation for the "Here's Hope" Joint Evangelistic Crusade across our state in May of 1982. This project was to help churches discover the names, addresses and other information concerning unsaved and unchurched persons in local areas.

In May 1982, twenty-four of our churches participated in the Here's Hope Crusade. There were fifty professions of faith, twelve added by letter, and the number of rededications were too numerous to list. Followup in many churches continues.

Prospects are now being considered to have an Association County Wide Crusade some time during the Summer of 1984. Evangelist to be named at a later date.

The following are the objectives of the Association in evangelistic promotion.

1. To lead each of our churches and their individual members to make a new commitment to reaching the lost and unchurched.
2. To engage in priority planning to reach persons with the gospel, carefully using time, money and resources.
3. Join with Southern Baptist throughout the world in a united effort to reach people for Christ during the 1982-85.
4. Challenge every church to increase their baptisms by 25% over last year and to set and report annual baptism goals.
5. Provide Witness Training for church members.

MISSIONS

The Associational Missions Department is proud to report that a variety of mission activities have been underway during the past year and that future plans are very encouraging. Under the able and dedicated leadership of our Director of Missions, Rev. J. Billy Graham, the ministries below have been, or are now going on.

1. A very effective "Here's Hope Crusade" was conducted in the spring.
2. "People Search" revealed areas where there is a need for new work to be developed. The First Baptist Church of Aberdeen has found such an area. A survey has been made and plans are underway to begin a new work soon.
3. The Middle Cross Baptist Church came into full fellowship with our Association during the past year. They are moving forward with a building program.
4. Faith Baptist Church was organized during the past year. It is located in the eastern sector of Association. They have been meeting in the Beaver Creek Community Building, but land has already been purchased and plans are being made to begin a building program soon.
5. Some study and research has been done in an effort to initiate a ministry to the migrants who come to the Sandhills.
6. A packet of materials designed to acquaint newcomers to our area with Baptist Churches and work is being prepared for selected distribution. The Baptist State Convention of N.C. has provided \$1,200.00 for this project.
7. A Resort Seminar was conducted in September at First Baptist Church of Aberdeen. The information gleaned from this meeting should enhance our efforts to reach many new people settling in this area with the Gospel.
8. A World Missions Conference is being planned for October 30 - November 2, 1983. Three members of the Associational Missions Committee attended the Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest in May.

All churches are urged to form a Missions Committee and to begin searching for ways to reach unsaved, unchurched people in their neighborhood. If all the churches of our Association work together with diligence and enthusiasm, the Lord will bless our efforts and many souls will be brought to know our Wonderful Lord. Moreover, Baptist Work will grow stronger and more influential with each passing year. This is our prayer.

PRISON MINISTRY REPORT

To date we have 363 inmates at the McCain Correctional Department. At present we have five men working in our Prison Ministry. Our services are held each Saturday at 10:00 a.m. Upon completion of the two services (general population and prospective custody) we stay and counsel with those seeking counseling who attended

services. After lunch we are allowed on the cell-blocks to do one on one visitation.

For this past year we have delivered 104 messages, made 70 visits, 51 professions of faith, given out 2,000 plus tracts and periodicals, shown five Christian films and hosted five singing groups. At Christmas we had two Christmas Cantatas, one by the Children's Choir and one by the Adult Choir of the Ashley Heights Baptist Church.

An Invitation to minister at McCain is extended to all pastors and churches of our association.

STEWARDSHIP

It is my desire as your Associational Stewardship Director to help your church reach its potential in giving locally as well as in mission involvement. Giving is a visible measuring stick of our commitment to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. "God so loved...that he gave." (John 3:16). In response to that love, we give "...Not grudgingly, or of necessity, for God loveth a cheerful giver." (2 Corinthians 9:7). How much you give is directly related to how much you love your Savior.

Two conferences were held last year to help educate and motivate your church in giving. On Monday, March 1, O. D. Martin, Director of the Department of Stewardship for North Carolina Baptists, met with the pastors to share with them the latest information in stewardship development. On June 7, I conducted a workshop for the pastor and two lay-people from each church. The purpose of this workshop was to present to the churches The Great Challenge Budget Program. As a result, the following churches participated in the program: Beaver Creek, Bethlehem, Calvary, Carthage First, Ephesus, Fairview, and Robbins First. INSTITUTIONS, AGENCIES, AND BOARD REPORTS

BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Our Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem has 673 beds in use, admitted 23,350 patients, provided a total of 210,000 days of patient care this year. Visits to outpatient clinics and emergency room total 65,381.

Special care by new procedures include: (1) anti-cancer drugs by means of an "infusion pump," which is implanted in the patient somewhat like a pacemaker, (2) a new type of x-ray called "digital radiography,"

used principally for examination of blood vessels, (3) a new type of dialysis for patients with kidney disease called "continuous ambulatory peritoneal dialysis."

The Pastoral Care Department continues to provide a pastoral ministry to both inpatients and outpatients and to their families. This year chaplain visited 48,209 patients. They provided 923 "on-call ministries" and led 262 worship services in Davis Chapel. The Pastoral Counseling Division provided 8,684 hours of counseling of 855 persons. Sixty-three students were enrolled in various levels of clinical-pastoral education. The Winston-Salem center and also the satellites in Fayetteville, Raleigh, Morganton, and Charlotte all continued to experience growth both in the types of services provided as well as in the number of people served.

The budget for the new fiscal year exceeds \$100,000,000 for the first time. Despite economic pressures, our hospital continues to operate in the black.

Cooperative Program gifts from the churches the past year amounted to \$479,997. North Carolina Missions Offering and designated gifts came to a total of \$345,765. Appreciation is expressed to the churches for continuing fine financial support.

During 1981 new thrusts and additions to old trusts totaled \$855,991.00, bringing the assets in all trusts to \$5,000,000.

Through its role as trustee agency, the Foundation will serve North Carolina Baptists by enabling them to enjoy Christian Stewardship in its fullest sense-- even after death.

BAPTIST CHILDRENS HOMES

All services of the Baptist Children's Homes are available through the Thomasville Family Services Center. These services include: Group living on four campuses, foster care, therapeutic camping, maternity care, emergency care, social work service, care for children in need of specialized assistance, care and development, counseling and professional services to family, and assistance to churches and associations in parent education and family living through the family Resource Center.

The foster home ministry continues to grow and is able to serve more children as more good Christian people respond to this special ministry.

Cameron Home, which provides therapeutic camping for boys from all across the State, has shown steady growth since its beginning in December, 1980. The program is operating with three groups of boys of 10 boys each. This is a highly specialized program of "friendship therapy" in a small group setting surrounded with nature's incentives for achievement and learning.

Mills Home Alumni are now renovating the oldest standing child care building in North Carolina. The Mitchell House, built in 1885, will soon house a museum which will help us to know "how it was."

A new 16mm 30 minute film was released in July called "You Need Me." This film is available to the churches by contacting the Children Homes.

Thank you for your continuing help through the Cooperative Program, the North Carolina Baptist Missions Offering and designated gifts.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

North Carolina Baptists, second only to Texas in founding and sponsoring colleges and universities, supports seven institutions of higher education. The seven are: Mars Hill in the town of Mars Hill, Gardner-Webb at Boiling Springs, Wingate in the town of Wingate, Wake Forest in Winston-Salem, Meredith in Raleigh, Campbell at Buies Creek, and Chowan at Murfreesboro.

This past year 15,798 students and 1,768 faculty and staff were a vital part of these seven schools. There were 224 foreign students from 57 countries. Students comprize a variety of vocations: church related vocations, 665; teaching, 1,314; medicine (including nursing, 1,329; law, 961; social work, 384. About 9,700 students received financial aid.

The colleges exist to educate our young people and adults. Churches are asked to point prospective toward a Baptist school. An interview with the college could possibly encourage some person to continue higher education, even though one may feel financially unable to do so.

Your Baptist Colleges are grateful for your generous support through the Cooperative Program and for sending prospective students. These colleges are proud of their Baptist heritage and are wanting to be effective partners with the churches.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES

Forty-five persons were admitted to the ministry of the Homes and apartments in 1981-82, making a total of 269 persons.

This past year the Trustees decided to conduct a Capital Funds Campaign. The primary need for the campaign is for the Hayes Home and the Nursing Unit in Winston-Salem.

The major concern of the Homes' ministry centers on benevolent care, assisting those who need supplementing financially. Cooperative Program gifts total \$516,804, providing 57% of benevolent care. Many persons on the Homes's waiting list cannot pay the full cost of care and have a longer period of waiting due to limited funds.

Your gifts and prayers are deeply appreciated. As God provided for Abraham in his need, we believe that God will provide our needs.

*HISTORICAL EVENTS IN THE CHURCHES

*The following historical events do not represent all events that occurred the past year in our churches, but are simply from the church clerk or historians who sent the materials to Mrs. G. P. Jones, our Historian. Mrs. Jones reminds our churches that church clerk's minutes and other important historical material may be sent to Wake Forest University for free microfilming.

ABERDEEN: The Children's Choir, "Joyful Sounds," was begun in October. In November four babies were dedicated. Mrs. Wayne Bryant directed the Adult Choir in presenting three musicals: "Home For Christmas," in December; "A Crown for the King," in April (more than 800 people enjoyed two performances); and "Sing and Share." in August. Needy families were provided for through a December "White Christmas in Sunday School." Morning worship services, February through July, were broadcast on WCEL. A new Pictorial Directory of 150 families was developed in March. Dr. Neil J. Armstrong preached the "Here's Hope Revival" Services in April. In July a Mission Team led by David Marks went to Mill Creek, West Va. to conduct VBS and Backyard Bible Clubs; a commissioning service was conducted on a Sunday morning, July 11. On World Hunger Day, August 1, \$1,250. was received.

CAMERON: Observed Youth Day in August, with Lemon Springs layman, Frank Suggs, bringing the message. Had record attendance at

Homecoming with 172 present with former pastor, Carroll Fonvielle, speaking. Ordained Frankie Comer as a deacon in November. Assisted Lisa Hendrick, Meredith College student and mission worker in West Virginia. A dedication service was held for six babies and their parents. In May the Acteens sponsored a Mother-daughter banquet. Mrs. Nannie Michael, age 93, was honored on Mother's day for being the oldest mother present for Sunday School and worship. The Irene Marion Circle gave a luncheon for the Senior Adults of the church. The church received a piano from the estate of Miss Clara Johnson, a sister of Miss Pearl Johnson, former missionary to China and Taiwan. Mrs. Pauline Snipes Hopling of Florida gave a generous contribution to the library in honor of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Spivey, former members. Some classrooms were renovated. New Baptist hymnals were purchased. (Annie Jones, Historian).

LEMON SPRINGS: The church achieved many accomplishments this year. Our deacons expanded our family ministry plan, established late in 1981, and set up a schedule of deacon rotation. The present 12 deacons will follow a rotation plan, with 4 rotating each year through 1983. New choir robes were acquired last Fall. We look forward to serving God in the coming church year. (Betty Howard, Historian).

PLEASANT HILL: The church participated in several Christian fellowship activities this year: RA Crusader Derby race, Wake Forest Day, VBS Field day and picnic, Camp Caraway, and several covered dish suppers. We had two song services with guest musicians - the Celestials and the Harper Brothers and Connie. We saw the film, "The Revival of Evil." Richard Frye taught a new converts class. Energy saving devices, a fire place insert and ceiling fan were installed in the parsonage. Two new heat pumps were installed at the church. Rev. Charles Allard, missionary to Brazil, and brother-in-law to our pastor, spoke to the church on mission work in Brazil. For the first time our sanctuary Christmas tree was decorated with Christmas ornaments symbolic of our Lord. Kay Neff made the ornaments and donated them to the church. A Breakfast followed Easter Sunrise service. Our WMU received the Merit Award, with Mara Horner, Director. A special offering was received for World Hunger. Our Youth were in charge of Sunday School and worship, August 15. Dr. and Mrs. Lal Din, Pakistan missionaries, led our Prayer Retreat, August 28. Acteens and GA's observed Christmas in August.

RED BRANCH: A church directory was completed this year. In October we conducted a church-wide, area-wide people search. Our pastor taught an Adult Survival Class, and continues new Christian training each Sunday at 5:00 p.m. Rev. Norman Simpson of Kinston was our Fall Revival speaker and Rev. Ed Hinkson of Pinebluff, Ark., was our speaker for the Spring Revival. We observed Baptist Men's Day, January 24. Our church united with Cross Road Baptist Church and Pine Grove Baptist Church for a joint Thanksgiving service, with Rev. Bennie Maness bringing the message. We are now in the process of constructing 6 new Sunday School rooms and an assembly room. Our Youth advisors led our fine youth group in a Prayer Retreat at Holden's Beach in June. The Youth attended the Youth Evangelism Conference in Fayetteville, August 21. More than 125 Christians enjoyed a "Back to School" recreation and fellowship. Two of our laymen, Vernon Yow and Bud Barber, went with an

Associational Mission Team to Old Fields in a mission construction project. (Mrs. G. P. Jones, Historian).

SOUTHERN PINES: The new church year began with a Wednesday Night Program in which all the mission organizations, the graded choirs, and Prayer Meeting met, and supper was served. This program will continue this year. We were host church for the Associational Prayer Retreat, March 27. Two young men, Shane Tolliver and Gary Greene, shared with the church their calls to full-time Christian ministry. Both are now enrolled in schools for preparation. Ruth Sinclair, our beloved organist for 12 years, resigned in July due to health problems. Ruth Ruth's beautiful ministry to our church over the years will be greatly missed. On August 8, the church surprised our pastor, John Stone and his wife, Catherine, with a love gift to be used for a special vacation, in honor of their 18th anniversary as our Pastor and wife. (Myra Robinson, Church Secretary).

TAYLOR MEMORIAL: This year our church renovated the parsonage (repainted, carpeted, draped windows, added more insulation, put vinyl on kitchen and hall floors.) Joined Rosaland United Methodist Church in a Community Thanksgiving Service with Rev. J. Billy Graham, presiding. Our Deacons gave all "old-timey" chicken stew at the church for the community. Carpeted, enclosed furnace, and paneled downstairs at church. A new riding lawn mower was purchased. A new electric typewriter was bought. A youth group was organized. A security light was installed behind the church. The cemetery was fenced and a water line was run to the cemetery. In honor of Sam Hartsell the Hartsell family gave an alter set to the church. 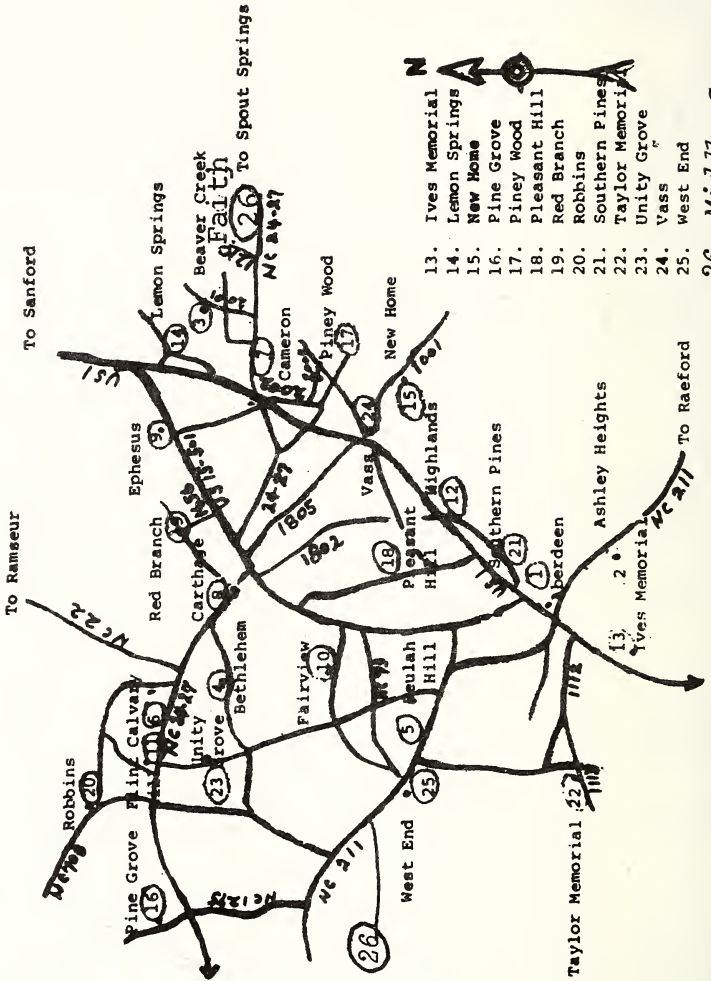

III. Constitution of the Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptist.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors, of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

(1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.

(3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.

(4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognized that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the Association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be *Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, three (3) Trustees, and Director of Missions.*

Section 2. Departments: This Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees - (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and Bylaws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Director of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) *Biblical Recorder*, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issued before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following Bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its Bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. *Moderator*

(a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.

(b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

(c) Shall be an ex officio members of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. *Vice-Moderator*: Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. *Clerk*:

- (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging the Association.
- (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. *Treasurer*:

- (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
- (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational newsletter each month.
- (d) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. *Historian*: Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the members churches and the Association.

Section 6. *Parliamentarian*: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. *Trustees*: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. *Director of Missions*:

(a) Search Committee:

1. The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

(b) Conditions of Employment:

1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.
2. Shall have three (3) weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.
3. May be away from the Association for three (3) weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five (5) Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c). Duties:

1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.
5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
6. Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
7. Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.
- (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.
- (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
- (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.
- (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the members churches and in Association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.
- (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

(a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audio-visual aid materials and equipment.

(b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

(a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.

(c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

(a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.

(b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.

(c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.

(d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.

(e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

(a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.

(b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

**ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE
ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES**

Section 1. The Associational Board:

(a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.

(b) The officers of the Association.

(c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.

(d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.

(e) The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meetings to the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastors' Conference. The Vice Moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services or services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The Association may amend or alter the Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

IV. Proceedings of the Thirty-fourth Annual Session Sandhills Baptist Association

October 17, 1983 - Pine Grove Baptist Church

EVENING SESSION

The 34th annual session of the Sandhills Baptist Association was called to order by Moderator Lee Rorie, October 17, 1983, at the Pine Grove Baptist Church. Ten minutes prior to the session, Campbell University Chorale provided inspirational music.

1. Rev. Rick Hodges read Ephesians 4:1-5 as the basis for his devotion on the theme, "Unity of the Spirit in the Bond of Peace," and then led in the opening prayer. Rev. Gene Booker led in singing the hymn, "Blessed Be the Name." Rev. Charles Lassister served as pianist for this session.

2. The moderator welcomed the messengers and guests, totaling 185, and expressed appreciation to Pine Grove Baptist Church for their gracious hospitality in hosting the association.

3. The Director of Missions recognized the new ministers since last year: Rev. and Mrs. Albert Taylor, Fairview; Rev. Rick Hodges, Taylor Memorial; Rev. and Mrs. Robert Morrison, Jr., Ephesus; Rev. David Helms, Minister of Education and Youth, Southern Pines First.

4. The Program Chairman, Rev. Allen Schuyler, moved the adoption of the Order of Service as printed, and that present registered messengers and messengers to register, constitute a quorum to conduct the business of the 34th annual session. Motion adopted.

5. J. Billy Graham presented the Director of Missions Report, expressing appreciation for support and prayers from all the churches, and appreciation for excellent leadership of our associational officers.

6. Fay Boroughs gave the W.M.U. Report, stating that foreign missionaries, Wayne and Peggy Dunn, would be the speakers for the 1984 W.M.U. Annual Meeting, March 20, at Taylor Memorial, and urged each church to increase mission giving by 15 percent.

7. Lane Hall presented the Brotherhood Report and added additional information about the Mt. State 200 Mission Work in West Virginia.

8. Don Hays gave the Evangelism Report, encouraging strong outreach and witness.

9. Bennie Maness gave the Credentials Committee Report, recognizing the newest member church, Faith Baptist, and giving a standing welcome to them into full fellowship of the Association.

10. Bob Morrison presented the Mission Department Report, encouraging each church to consider developing a Missions Committee and requesting support from the churches in helping start a mission church in Seven Lakes.

11. Robert Denton gave the Prison Ministry Report, assisted by two of his members, Don Needham and Johnny Rumpfelt, inviting churches to assist in ministry to prisoners in local penal institutions.

12. Wayne Adams gave the Church Training Report, emphasizing the need for on-going training in our churches, and reminding us of the availability of excellent training resources, such as the Equiping Center Modules.

13. Allen Schuyler gave a slide presentation, depicting the people of the four counties (Moore, Lee, Hoke, Harnett) of our association, showing some locations of our churches and the diversity of the people in our area.

14. Gene Booker led in singing the hymn, "Jesus Saves."

15. Inspiring special music was provided by the Campbell University Choir, directed by Dr. Robert Piper.

16. J. Billy Graham introduced Dr. Ray Benfield, former pastor at Carthage First, missionary to Austria, who brought an inspiring mission message.

17. Rev. Bennie Maness reminded us that Pine Grove ladies had provided refreshments in the fellowship hall. Rev. Tom Barnes pronounced the blessing and benediction.

October 18, 1983 - Aberdeen First Baptist

AFTERNOON SESSION

1. Lee Rorie, moderator, called the session to order and recognized visitors and messengers.

2. With Rev. Charles Lassister at the piano, Rev. Gene Booker led in the singing of the hymn, "Praise Him! Praise Him!" Mr. Bill Bost then gave the devotional from Psalms 112.

3. Lee Proctor gave the Sunday School Report, stating a turn around in Sunday School enrollment, encouraging outreach and enlistment for Sunday School.

4. J. Billy Graham called attention to the Music Report prepared by Rick Downing and stated that a Music Workshop for music leaders would be conducted, January 30-31, 1984, at Beaver Creek.

5. Allen Schuyler gave the Youth and Campus Ministry Report, stating that Mr. Tom McNeil will be the Youth Director for 1983-84, and that a continuing ministry to students at Sandhills Community College is provided.

6. Gene Booker gave the Stewardship Report, challenging us to Bold Giving to the association and the Cooperative Program, mentioning that Dr. Cecil Ray had been elected to the new S.B.C. Stewardship position in order to help lead Southern Baptists in Bold Missions giving.

7. Mrs. Jessie Hales gave the Senior Adult Report, urging Seniors in our churches to be involved, not leaving out "hugging and kissing."

8. Mrs. Daphne Leonard presented the Library/Media Report, stressing how this ministry contributes to Christian growth and to support of all the work of the church.

9. Allen Schuyler moved that all reports be adopted as presented. Motion passed.

10. Gene Booker, alternate for the annual sermon, read scripture from II Timothy 4, and led in prayer. Max Gilmore brought an inspirational message on "Speaking the Word of God with Authority," encouraging preachers to speak with conviction and confidence "Thus saith the Lord."

11. Charles Lassiter led in a reverent memorial service, commemorating our beloved dead, giving thanks to God for their lives and their faithful service in our churches. Gene Booker led in the singing of the hymn, "Faith in the Victory."

12. John Mullinax announced that Dr. Cecil Ray would be the guest speaker at the next Pastors' Conference. The moderator recognized representatives Carol Robinson, Meredith College, Charles Hinson, Wake Forest, and Jesse Mansfield, Chowan College.

13. Tom Barnes introduced Rev. R. Gene Puckett, Editor, *Biblical Recorder*, who brought an informative report and message on the work and ministry of our Baptist state paper.

14. The moderator recognized Rev. Charles Hinson, host pastor, who instructed us about facilities and the evening meal, and gave the blessing and benediction.

EVENING SESSION

1. Lee Rorie, moderator, called the evening session to order. With Deborah Richardson at the piano, Gene Booker led in singing the hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name." Mr. Wade Short read scripture from Hebrew 11:1-2, and Hebrews 12:1-2 and led in prayer.

2. The Director of Missions stated that several churches had doubled giving to the association and to the Cooperative Program, 1977-1982, and several churches doubled their baptisms during the period. With Gene Booker, Stewardship, certificates were presented to these churches in appreciation for their achievements in reaching the Bold Mission goals.

3. Rev. Larry Sawyer, Director, Family Services, Baptist Children's Home, Thomasville, was recognized.

4. Max Gilmore, World Missions Conference Coordinator, gave a report on the upcoming World Missions Conference, October 30-November 2, and encouraged our people to plan to attend every conference possible. Twenty-two churches are participating, with 21 missionaries staying at Sheraton Inn as guest speakers.

5. Dewitt Purvis gave the Clerk's Digest of Letters, showing increases in almost every category of associational work, and comparing the record of 1983 with the year 1973, using percentages for the 10-year period.

6. Allen Schuyler gave the Seminary Extension Report, stating that a study is being made to determine the need for seminary extension classes, and that a report

would be made at the January Board meeting.

7. Charles Hammond presented the Nominations Committee Report which was adopted as given.

8. Tom McNeil gave the Committee on Committees Report which was adopted as presented.

9. Dr. Fleet Allen presented the Treasurer's Report with a correction on one item on Robbins total contribution. The report was adopted with gratitude for Dr. Allen's faithful work.

10. Curtis Bettini gave the Finance and Budget Report, which was adopted after a correction on II. Total, (\$5,858.). It was moved that the budget be opened again to provide an additional \$6,000 for the Seven Lakes mission project. Adopted.

11. John Mullinax presented the Place and Preacher Report which was adopted as given.

12. Fleet Allen gave the General Board Report which was adopted as given.

13. Mrs. Elaine Adams moved that the Resolutions Report be adopted and that we forego the reading of the report. Adopted.

14. Jesse Mansfield led in an impressive installation of officers ceremony, giving each officer a piece of twine, reminding the officers that they were to be about the business of "mending nets" for Jesus as leaders in the association. J. Billy Graham led in the prayer of dedication.

15. Gene Booker led in the singing of the hymn, "I Know Whom I Have Believed."

16. Aberdeen First Baptist Church choir blessed us with the singing of two special music selections.

17. Allen Schuyler introduced Dr. Malcolm Tolbert, Professor of New Testament Interpretation, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, who delivered an inspiring message on the subject, "Unity of the Spirit in the Bond of Peace."

18. Moderator Lee Rorie presented the gavel to the new moderator, Rev. Eugene Payne, who entertained a motion that the Sandhills Baptist Association adjourn and led in the closing prayer and benediction.



V. Officers Reports

1. Director of Missions Report

The theme for the Associational Week of Prayer in May was "The Association: A Family of Churches." We are a Family of Churches on mission for Christ in our setting. Central to the making of a good association is fellowship, cooperation, and unity.

This has been a good year. Attendance to several of our conferences and workshops has been good. We still hope for better participation, not for the sake of

attending a meeting, but to train our people to be better servants for our Lord. Over 100 persons were in attendance for both the World Missions Conference preparation session in July and for the Key Leadership Conference in August. Nineteen churches were represented at the September Board meeting.

Some of our churches met their Bold Mission goals set back in 1977. Let us continue to work on Bold Missions goals set back in 1977. Let us continue to work on Bold Missions goals. Through 1985 we will be seeking to (1) reach people, (2) develop believers, and (3) strengthen families. We hope to proclaim the Gospel to every person in all the world by the end of the century.

New Work is a great need in many places in our nation. We have received two new churches, Middle Cross and Faith, into our membership within the past two years. Our Missions Department is studying the possibility for new work in areas, particularly the Seven Lakes area.

Four churches were without pastors, at least for part of the year: West End First, Pleasant Hill, Fairview, and Unity Grove. We owe a debt of gratitude to the men of God who served as supply preachers or interim pastors: Rev. Joe Watterson, Rev. Robert Wilson, Rev. Richard Hopkins, Rev. Paul Nickens, and Rev. Bryson Bigby. Rev. James Cagle is available for supply. Rev. Robert Morrison, Jr., was called to Ephesus Church and is enjoying a dynamic ministry there. Rev. David Helms has been well received as Minister of Education and Youth at Southern Pines First. It is my privilege to serve our churches through supply, teaching, training, and consultation. Let us continue to pray for our churches that are searching for pastors. Fairview called Rev. Albert Taylor of Asheboro, effective October 16.

Mrs. Graham and I enjoyed teaching mission studies just before or during the Week of Prayer for State, Home and Foreign Missions. We are looking forward to our World Missions Conference, October 30-November 2. Twenty-two churches are participating, and the other five are invited to attend the services and hear the first hand reports by our missionaries. The Missions Conference is jointly sponsored with Pee Dee Association.

Our newsletter, *The Spotlight*, is sent monthly to 535 leaders and members in our association. Input from church reports is greatly appreciated.

Thank you for your prayers and support in every way.

4. General Board Report

The General Board of the State Baptist Convention met three times in 1983 at the new Baptist Building in Cary, Campbell University and Camp Caraway.

During 1983 I was elected to serve on the Christian Higher Education Committee. One of the activities of this committee in 1983 was to aid our Baptist Colleges and Universities to recruit more North Carolina Baptist Students. All seven Baptist Institutions in North Carolina increase their enrollment this fall to the maximum of funds available. The Cooperative Program support of these institutions for 1984 has been recommended to be \$4,887,342, up \$139,759 from the 1983 budgeted amount.

The 1983 year has been a good one for the State Baptist Convention; some events were:

- (1) Cooperative Program giving by our churches was up, through August, 1983, by nine percent over 1982.
- (2) The new Baptist Building was completed and occupied debt free.
- (3) A new, much improved church annuity program was developed, to take effect in 1984, to cover all church employees and pastors.
- (4) The Baptist Hospital's administration has planned an \$86 million hospital expansion program; a detailed financial plan to borrow and pay back these funds, by the hospital was developed.
- (5) The Assemblies Committee developed a three-year fund raising proposal to raise \$3 million to complete Fort Caswell's previously approved, capital improvement program.
- (6) The Budget Committee proposed a 1984 budget of \$24,475,000 based on projected receipts from our churches.

All the above recommendations were approved by the General Board and will be presented at the Annual Meeting of the State Baptist Convention for their adoption.

This is my first year as representative of Sandhills Baptist Association on the General Board. I appreciate the opportunity to serve on your behalf.

VI. Departmental Reports

1. Brotherhood Department

Baptist Men and Royal Ambassadors emphasize mission education, and mission action in the local community, state and other places in our world.

We continue to encourage lay involvement in evangelism and missions. Laymen are needed to help start new work and to sustain present work.

On January 23, 1983, our churches participated in activities led by Baptist Men. On February 21 the Baptist Men's Rally was held at Vass First Baptist.

Jack Robinson is providing excellent leadership for our associational R.A. work. The Crusader Car Race was conducted in the fall of 1982 with four churches participating. Over 100 boys engaged in the Field Day/Mission Conference held at Pinecrest High School in the spring.

Baptist men and boys are encouraged to be involved in mission work in our area, such as prison ministry, and in West Virginia where we are helping start 100 new Baptist churches by 1985. Nine churches, or individuals from our churches supported the work in Virginia, either financially or in some type of mission endeavor. Seven groups, either for building construction or to take materials were involved. Fourteen persons gave of themselves in construction. The churches contributed \$1,585 to Mt. State 200. Beulah Hill is contributing \$200.00 a month to the Baptist church in Rock Cave, West Virginia plus an \$800.00 love offering to help start a new church building.

On October 3, 1983, a Baptist Men and R.A. Workshop (three conferences) was conducted at Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, with over 30 attending. Deacon Jimmy Melton of Taylor Memorial has agreed to serve as Brotherhood President this year. Jimmy will serve with Lane as part of the Brotherhood Council for the association. This year let us try to involve our men and boys more in world missions.

Several emphases were stressed during the 1982-83 year, with the theme "Equipping for Family and Ministry." Attendance at the "M" Night Program at Carthage was up over the previous year with seven churches participating.

There are many ways churches can become involved in Church Training, in addition to the regular weekly Training Union: Equipping Centers, church leader training, doctrinal studies, and member training. All of these activities should be counted in the annual report in the church letter.

PROJECT 400 offers an opportunity for our churches to begin new Church Training Programs in the association. For those churches wishing to begin a program of equipping members with the skills and knowledge to be effective disciples, this program offers an outstanding opportunity! Pastors and church leaders who are interested in starting new programs should contact the associational office so that help can be obtained from the Church Training Department of the Baptist State Convention.

Let each of us resolve to do more in 1983-84 in the area of discipleship training. Can we afford to do less if we are to follow God's directive in training Christians to be disciples?

3. Evangelism Department

The Associational Evangelism Department is happy to report that there is a Renewed Evangelism Spirit being shown by each of our member churches and its pastors. Trends towards a more evangelistic commitment is quite evident within our association. Most of our churches along with their pastors are now equipping their

local membership with evangelistic tools such as Survival Kit Training for New Christians and Growth Commitment Training.

For the most part, many of our churches have shown a marked increase in the number of baptisms over last year. Our pastors and members are increasing their effort to reach the lost, the inactive and the unchurched.

Many of our churches have recently completed Sunday School Enlargement Growth Campaigns. As a result of these campaigns, we can report that these churches have shown a substantial increase in new members in Sunday School and church membership.

Efforts towards beginning new missions has been undertaken by our association. At present, a new mission study is being held in respect towards starting a new mission in the Seven Lakes area. This new mission has found support from several churches within our association. Plans to see this project come to realization are still in progress as of this date.

All reports from our churches show that overall, they have had a better year in the area of evangelism than last year. Reports from each church show that their spring and fall revivals have been successful. Many decisions for Christ have been made and followup and training continues.

Twenty-three of our churches supported and held services to draw attention to World Missions Conference in October and November. Services will lean towards missions and the importance of our associational churches in this area of lending help to our missionaries at home and abroad.

Let me continue to encourage each of our churches and their pastors, to step up their evangelistic efforts. Commit your people to make evangelistic efforts in the areas of witness training, seeking the lost, the unchurched and the inactive within your respective areas.

5. Missions Department

The Associational Missions Department started its year with two objectives in mind. The first was to encourage the 25 active associational churches to form active Mission Committees. Our goal, in this effort, was set at 10 churches. Unfortunately, this goal has not been met.

The next objective was to pursue immediately with plans to start a new work in the Seven Lakes area near West End, North Carolina. Our first goal being, "examine the possibilities of securing a church planter from the Home Missions Board." Letters were mailed to all pastors in the Sandhills Association requesting that they encourage their congregations to assist in the financing of this project. As this report is being prepared, 10 churches have responded favorably, but more commitments are needed. The amount of monies needed for this project has exceeded what was originally anticipated. We are presently studying the best approach for continuing this much-needed project.

One of the greatest dangers within our denomination is that we turn inward ministering only to our own, neglecting our God-given commission to increase and expand His Kingdom.

The church at Laodicea turned inward and became self-deceived. They became self-content and self-satisfied. Our Lord Jesus Christ said to this church, "... Thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked." "Our Lord Himself stood on the *outside* of this wretched church."

One committee can never accomplish its goals and objectives unless we all work together for the same purpose -- each church seeing its own responsibility to Christ and His Kingdom.

If we, as Sandhills Association Baptist churches, are to increase our growth rate, we must begin new congregations in *extension* growth.

There is the need for *radical* changes in the concept of professional ministry. A need for church members to assume stronger roles in witness, decreasing their dependency on a "paid staff." We need to go into areas that are untouched by the Gospel (here in our *own communities*) because of ethnic, cultural, economic, or social barriers that we as Christians allow to impede witness. We are not accomplishing this in our own congregations.

The answer is to plant more churches. We seek your prayers, help, and consecrated dedication to the expansion of His Kingdom.

The *positive* results of any Missions Committee cannot be seen in days, weeks, months, but in years of dedicated, hard work, and giving together, all together for His cause.

8. Stewardship Department

Southern Baptists did not reach their five-year goal, 1978-82 of doubling their gifts through the Cooperative Program and Associational Missions. However, tremendous progress was made. We reached 70 percent of that goal. When you consider the state of the economy during most of that five-year period, we did quite well. We have set more goals in our Sandhills Association. Each church was to give a minimum of 10 percents of its undesignated gifts through the Cooperative Program, and three percent to the Sandhills Association by the end of 1983. The amount to the association is to be increased one percent each year, for a total of five percent by 1985. Our support through the Cooperative Program and our association is imperative if we are serious about the mandate of our Lord. Remember! He said, "Go . . . Teach . . . Baptize . . . Disciple."

We had two special emphases last year to help strengthen your church in the area of stewardship. Talmadge Williams led church staff members in a conference on February 28, and I led a workshop for pastors and two laypersons from each church on June 6. Similar workshops will be held in 1984 on February 27 and June 4.

An exciting venture for us is in the future. All churches for our association are urged to participate in a 15-year Planned Growth in Giving emphasis, 1985-2000 A.D. On first impulse, the goals are shocking, but after prayerful thought, they are reachable. Southern Baptist church receipts are to grow to 20 billion dollars annually by 2000 A.D., and Cooperative Program gifts are to reach 2½ billion dollars that year.

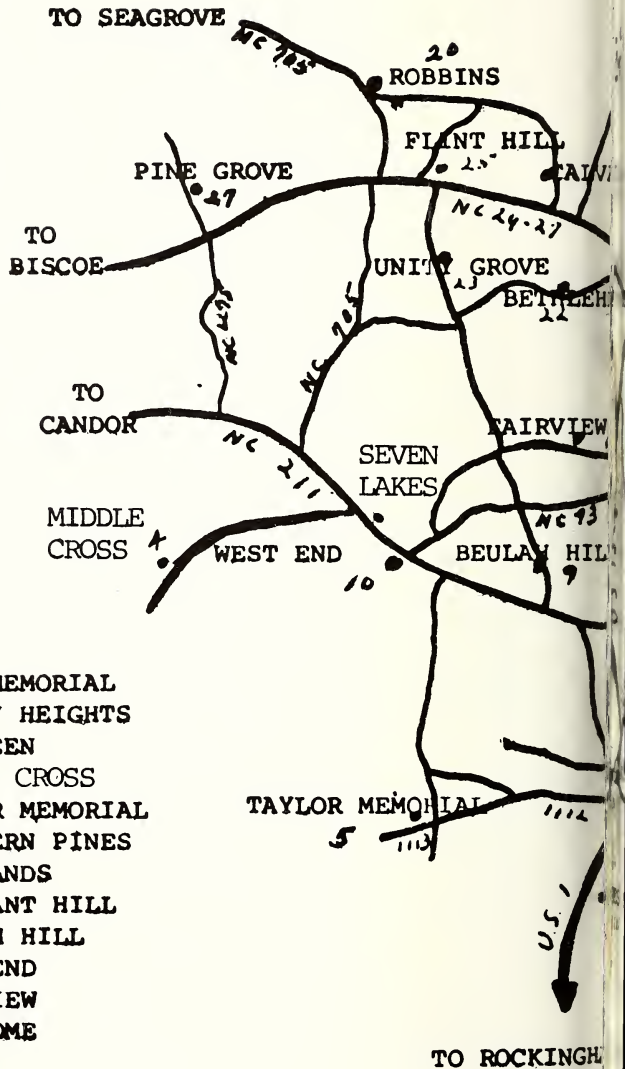

9. Sunday School Department

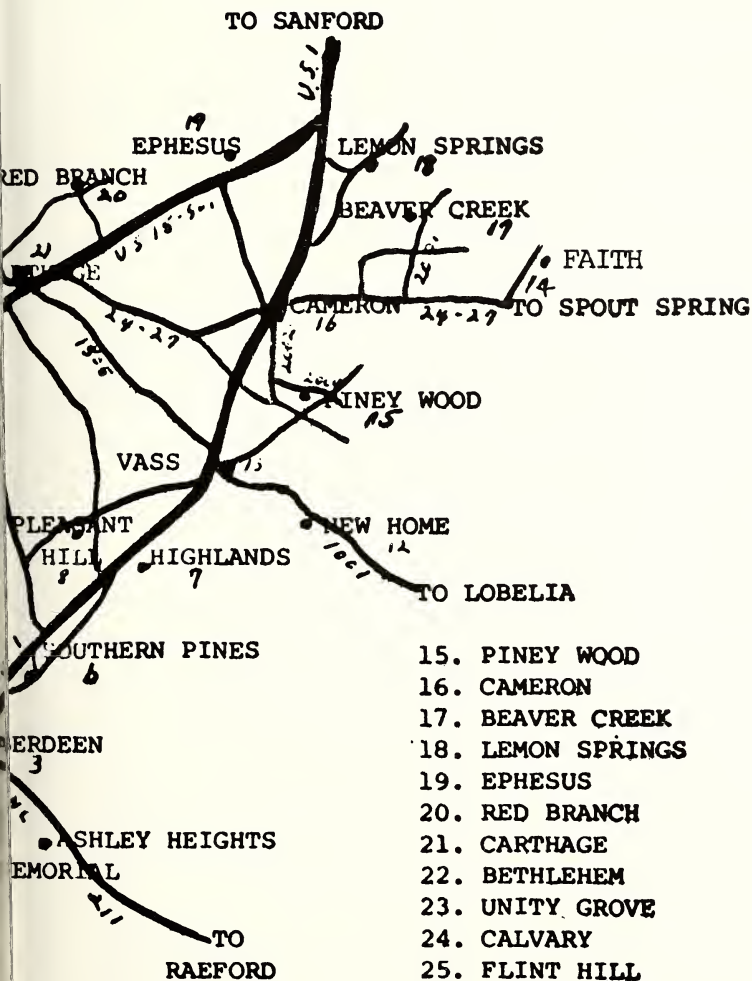

about growth in several churches. 7. Seminary Extension Study Committee

The Seminary Extension Study Committee met in March with Corbin Cooper, the Director of Seminary Extension work for the North Carolina Baptist Convention. Rev. Cooper, over a dinner meeting at Jimmy's Seafood, explained what seminary extension is and how an association goes about trying to establish this work. After a great deal of discussion the group was given different areas to pursue until the next meeting. Meanwhile, an attempt has been made to contact pastors to see if they or any of their church members would be interested in being involved in studying and training to be more effective Christians and churchmen. The results of this polling is not yet known. If the interest is high enough, then the committee will process to suggest a director of Seminary Extension, secure teachers, develop a curriculum based on need and interests, and start the class. We hope to have this information by January, 1984.

VIII. Institutions, Agencies, and Boards

1. Baptist Hospital

Our Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem has 700 beds in use, admitted 23,903 patients, provided a total of 213,021 days of patient care this year. Visits to outpatient clinics and emergency room total 66,039.

A nuclear magnetic resonance machine has been installed which produces pictures better than x-rays without any radiation hazards. New treatment aimed at finding and removing the cause of heart attacks is being used.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to provide a pastoral ministry to patients and their families. In 1983 more than 14,000 hours of pastoral service was provided to hospital patients. The Pastoral Counseling Division provided 14,494 hours of counseling to persons who had individual concerns. Over 100 students received training in various levels of clinical pastoral education.

Baptist Hospital employs approximately 3,500 people and has buildings and equipment valued at more than \$100,000,000. The operating budget for 1983 was \$101,000,000. Another major capital expansion program is planned when construction funds are available.

The hospital is operating in the black with only a four percent room rate increase during 1983.

During the fiscal year 1982 the hospital received through the Cooperative Program \$497,019. North Carolina Missions Offerings came to \$343,665. The hospital administration and staff express their appreciation to the churches for their continuing support.

The asset value of trusts held at the end of last fiscal year totalled \$8,214,696.00. Designated new additions to trusts were \$276,815.00. Income from investments of trust assets totalled \$523,140.00. Investment asset market value gain during the year was \$398,812.00.

IX. Historical Events in the Churches

ABERDEEN: Aberdeen Christian Renewal Services at Page Memorial United Methodist Church. In December, White Christmas in Sunday School. Food wrapped in white paper, placed on the altar and distributed to the needy in the community. Also outdoor Christmas drama sponsored by Youth, using the young people and live stock, portraying the birth of Christ. Robert P. Morrison, Jr., ordained to the gospel ministry. In January we began morning worship services broadcast on radio "WCEL" on a permanent basis. April 17-23 was "Baptist Men's Mission Trip to West Virginia." Group of our men assisted in building project at Old Fields, West Virginia. In May we had "Baby Dedication Service." Six babies dedicated. We had two large trophy cases built and situated in hallway on main floor of educational building. Proceeds to build these trophy cases from the Harry Watson Memorial Softball Tournament, and the Harry Watson family in memory of him. (Juanita R. Lomax, Church Clerk.)

BETHLEHEM: We purchased a new piano for our church. (Martin Baugh, Church Clerk.)

CALVARY: Under the guidance of their pastor, a new fellowship building is being built. The men of the church are doing all the work and will be about 90 percent finished at end of this church year. (Janet Brewer, Church Clerk.)

CAMERON: We had Homecoming in October '82, with Rev. Joe Babb, a former pastor, as the guest minister for the morning. Don Whaley of Dublin, North Carolina ministered to us with music. Approximately 250 people were in attendance this Homecoming ('82). "Lula Rogers Day" was held in the last week in May to honor Miss Lula Rogers for her 80 years of membership and her many years of devoted service as church treasurer, pianist, and many others. During June, July, and August several of our youth attended church camps: two R.A.s attended Camp Caraway; three G.A.s attended Camp Mundo Vista; and four Acteens attended Camp Mundo Vista. Youth Day was observed in August, with the youth taking charge of the various teaching, supervisory, and choir services on the fourth Sunday in August. Joe Nelson, the former principal at Cameron Elementary School, and his family, were honored at a reception for their 10 years of faithful service in the church and community. Mr. Nelson has accepted a position as principal at a high school in Spencer, North Carolina.

We began a tape ministry for shut-ins and those in the hospitals, so that those who are unable to attend church may have an opportunity to hear the church worship services. A building fund was established this year for the future construction of an educational building. Rev. Eugene Payne attended the Southern Baptist Convention at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania this year. (Glenn N. Rogers, Historian.)

CARTHAGE: Biggest event in Carthage First Baptist Church during the year 1982-83 was observance of the 125th anniversary on Sunday, May 15, 1983. Carthage First Baptist was established in May 1858, with 22 members. That first church building was on Ray Street and stood for 70 years before the present structure was occupied in 1928 on McNeill Street. Message for the anniversary observance was delivered by Dr. Michael Blackwell, a former pastor. Following the morning service, dinner

was enjoyed on the grounds. During the special service several people were recognized by Pastor Allen Schuyler. Among them were the following: Oldest members - Mrs. Beulah Maxwell; Longest membership - Mrs. Pearle Fry and Mrs. Esther Yow who were baptized in the first church in 1907; Oldest couple - Mr. and Mrs. C.T. Henson; Members (90 years or more) - Mrs. Beulah Maxwell, Mrs. Pearle Fry, Mrs. Esther Stutts and Mrs. Esther Yow. Two former pastors of the church, Dr. Michael Blackwell and Rev. Walter Warford were honored. Church staff members and the Anniversary Committee were also recognized. In the audience for the special service were many former members from a wide area. Keepsakes to commemorate the anniversary day were on sale for those desiring to secure one. A number also made special gifts towards retiring the debt on the new parsonage built in 1979. A special committee has drawn up a Church Constitution which has been approved by the Deacons, and will be submitted to the membership in the early fall for approval. During December, a 24-hour prayer vigil was held for Foreign Missions and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. It was a great success with many of the membership participating. (Woodrow Wilhoit, Church Clerk).

IVES MEMORIAL: In February our Home Mission book study was led by Brother Cecil Wetherbolt, a church planter for H.M.B. in Fairmont, West Virginia. This study led our people to give more than a thousand dollars to Annie Armstrong Offering over and above our goal of \$850. Our church voted in May to attempt to begin a mission in a neighboring area that a survey reveals a church can be used in the community. The Sunday School Enlargement Campaign was of significant benefit. We were led by David Blackney of Horseshoe, North Carolina. The Sunday School team voted to implement a new record system, including going to a permanent Sunday School Roll. This roll will be a target group for ministry for each grouping in the Sunday School. The team also voted to have preschoolers and children go directly to their rooms, rather than going to assembly. These decisions were reached in March along with making other goals. Also a Search Committee is to be appointed to get a part-time minister of music. (Claudie Carpenter, Historian).

LEMON SPRINGS: We are proud of the accomplishments made by our church this year. We decided to have annual homecoming. The committee in charge of this is made up of the Church Council, Chairman of Hospitality Committee, and the Historian. Homecoming will be held each year on the first Sunday in October. Pews have been placed in the balcony. A committee consisting of Roy Buchanan, Connie Deal, Jimmy Matthews, and Howard Sherron are checking on building a fellowship hall in the near future and cost of this. Joyce Taylor has been ordained a deaconess. An organ fund has been started and a church library has been opened for the Sunday School classes. (Betty Howard, Historian.)

PLEASANT HILL: Our church exceeded its goals for Lottie Moon and Annie Armstrong Mission Offering. The annual Christmas play entitled "The Perfect Gift" was directed by Mary Lee Flinchmum, Key Neff, Brenda Jones, Frances Williams, and Bertha Reynolds. Costumes for the play were made by Joan Morris. We joined Beulah Hill in a "Watch Night Service." In January Rev. Roy Little resigned as our pastor to accept a call to Madison, North Carolina. The Rev. Robert Wilson of Broadway is serving as interim pastor. A large crowd attended the Sunrise Easter Service and the breakfast. The parsonage has been painted and new carpet installed. A Youth Choir for ages 3 through 5 has been organized with Deanna Watkins directing. The Church Annual Youth Sunday was August 14. (Kay D. Neff, Historian.)

RED BRANCH: We began our new church year by re-organizing our Sunday School. Four new classes with several new teachers. The first Sunday in December we moved into our new additional classrooms. We now have 19 Sunday School rooms. We reached our goal for North Carolina State Missions and exceeded both the Foreign and Home Mission goals. Our church for the first time in history hosted the

Associational W.M.U. Prayer Retreat in February. We placed 34th in baptisms this past year in North Carolina Southern Baptist Convention. Our pastor taught an 11-week course using the "Survival Kit." The youth responded well in attendance and participation. Men of the church erected three crosses on the hill beyond church cemetery. The Easter Sunrise Service was held there with a large crowd in attendance. Breakfast followed the service in the fellowship hall. The six weeks "Way of the Cross" Campaign to increase Sunday School attendance and get new members began the first Sunday in June. A goal of 250 in Sunday School was set. It ended the second Sunday in July with 268 in Sunday School that morning and 23 new members. We have a complete W.M.U. organization now with 76 enrolled. Also R.A.s, including Crusaders and Pioneers organized in April. With their directors they attended Field Day at Pinecrest and won trophies, and blue and red ribbons. We donated our old hymn books to the Baptist Church in Old Field, West Virginia. We donated a pew to Middlecross Baptist Church. Rev. Jim Hales of Heritage, West Virginia, assisted our pastor in fall revival. Rev. Mike Snellgrove of our association assisted in spring revival. Preparations are underway for our part in the World's Mission Congerence. We had a splendid attendance in the workshop in Carthage and also at the Key Leadership Conference later. We will soon begin a study on "How to Witness" to be taught by our pastor. (Mrs. G.P. Jones, Historian.)

TAYLOR MEMORIAL: Called Rev. Richard Hodges as our pastor. Gave an appreciation gift and dinner for Rev. and Mrs. Richard Hopkins, interim pastor. Elected and ordained Thomas Garner as deacon. Ordained David Boroughs to the Gospel Ministry. Youth Council formed and taught Intensive Baptist Doctrine Study. Church-wide drive for literature and a love offering for the church in Old Field, West Virginia. Installed a heat pump and new kitchen stove in the parsonage. Carpeted remainder of Sunday School rooms and graveled the parking lot. Purchased a P.A. system for Nursery, also a new lawn mower. Our youth attended Youth Evangelism Clinic in Greensboro. (Mrs. Clayton Kirk, Historian.)

VASS: Marcia Todd was called as Director of Music Ministries. Judy Mansfield accepted position for Youth Minister. W.M.U. started a Crisis Closet at the church to benefit needy members of the community. Youth attended State Youth Associational meeting in Fayetteville with leader Judy Mansfield and Pastor Jesse Mansfield. Missionary Jack Martin and family held weekend revival in May and attended a People Appreciation Pig Picking given for our members by our Pastor and his family. Youth of our church enjoyed a retreat at Myrtle Beach in July. A People Search Campaign was started. Our Chapel was revitalized by the addition of new siding and a new paint job on the roof. Twelve new members were added to our church body this year. (Belinda Hennings, Historian.)

EPHESUS: This has been a year of challenge, renewal and growth, begun under the leadership of our then interim pastor, Robert L. Wilson. Observed World Hunger Day and several of our youth and adults also participated in the countywide Crop Walk, a 10-mile walk to raise money to combat hunger. Our own Erick Meir, who was nine years of age came in second of all the participants from the area of Sanford and Lee County. Fall revival, with Rev. Fulton Thomas as guest evangelist, was a time of spiritual renewal. Churchwide weeks of prayer for home and foreign missions, mission studies, Christmas in August and a prayer retreat led by Associational G.A. leader, Linda Presley, were all sponsored by the W.M.U. Mission Friends grew to form two groups. The Constitution and Bylaws were put into attractive booklet form and made available to each church family. Community Thanksgiving service with White Hill Presbyterian Church and Center United Methodist Church. "White Christmas" project helped many families have a more cheerful Christmas. The Christmas play "The Silver Forest," directed by Judy Allen, music director, was perhaps our best ever. Rev. Robert H. (Bob) Morrison, Jr. was called as pastor and he began his full-time service Sunday, February 6, 1983. We are experiencing growth

and many exciting "firsts" under his leadership. A pictorial church directory was completed, our very first! Honored our pastor and his wife Pauline and Mrs. Vera Hix at a very special fellowship meal. Mrs. Hix, our eldest member has been a great inspiration with her dedication and commitment. Construction has begun on a 4,000 square foot building which will contain a fellowship hall and Sunday School classrooms. Hosted the first joint Community Christian Renewal and Commitment Services July 17-20 with White Hill Presbyterian and Center United Methodist Church congregations and pastors also participating. Each pastor brought a message and the services were climaxed by a message brought by Dr. Albert Edwards, pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Raleigh, North Carolina and music by the combined choirs of about 50 voices. Another first was the employment of a summer youth worker. Phillip Townsend led our youth and children in an exciting, busy summer, greatly enhancing our youth program. Eight youths were led to accept Christ during the summer. Twelve youths, youth leaders, and Mr. and Mrs. Morrison attended youth week at Caswell. The youth raised the entire cost, over \$1,000, themselves by various activities. Churchwide outreach visitation program was begun and continues with good participation. Rev. Fain Farmer of Dallas, North Carolina, led our Sunday School Enlargement and Promotion training. A pastor study has been converted from a classroom and has been attractively furnished and decorated. This another first! On July 17, 1983 the 30-voice choir wore their beautiful new robes for the first time. A very fine lay team, coordinated by Mr. Shirlow Powell of Raleigh, North Carolina led our lay-led revival. Seventy home visits were attempted and witness was made to 35 persons. A van has been purchased and many plans are in the making for its use in various activities. We are looking forward to serving our Lord Jesus Christ in the coming year. (Viola Bowling, Historian, Rev. Robert H. Morrison, Pastor.)

We appreciate the response of the churches I have recorded here. We would like to have all our churches send in the events that should be recorded in history.

We want to remind you our one special effort this coming church year will be to urge all churches to send their minutes to Wake Forest University for microfilming. Please contact either Mr. Graham or myself and we will give you further information. It is free just by sending your minutes to the university. It takes about 15 days for them to do the job. Thank you.

III. Constitution

of the

Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptist.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors, of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

(1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.

(3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.

(4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the

Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognized that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the Association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be *Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, three (3) Trustees, and Director of Missions.*

Section 2. Departments: This Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees - (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and Bylaws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Director of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) *Biblical Recorder*, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following Bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its Bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. *Moderator*

(a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.

(b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

(c) Shall be an ex officio members of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. *Vice-Moderator*: Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. *Clerk*:

(a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.

(c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging the Association.

(d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. *Treasurer*:

(a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.

(b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.

(c) Shall provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational newsletter each month.

(d) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. *Historian*: Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the members churches and the Association.

Section 6. *Parliamentarian*: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. *Trustees*: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. *Director of Missions*:

(a) Search Committee:

1. The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

(b) Conditions of Employment:

1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.

2. Shall have three (3) weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.

3. May be away from the Association for three (3) weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.

4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five (5) Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c). Duties:

1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.
4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.
5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
6. Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
7. Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.
- (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.
- (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
- (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.

(c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

(a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the members churches and in Association-wide efforts.

(b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.

(c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

(a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

(a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audio-visual aid materials and equipment.

(b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

(a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.

(c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

(a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.

(b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.

(c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.

(d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.

(e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
- (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

**ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE
ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES**

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the Association.
- (c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
- (e) The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meetings to the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastors' Conference. The Vice Moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than

four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services or services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The Association may amend or alter the Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

October 22, 1984 - Unity Grove Baptist Church

EVENING SESSION

The 35th Annual Session of the Sandhills Baptist Association was called to order by Moderator Eugene Payne, October 22, 1984, at Unity Grove Baptist Church. Rev. Charles Lassiter was at the piano.

1. Rev. Clifford Williams read Scripture, led in the devotion, and opened the session with prayer. Rev. Gene Booker led in singing the hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus."

2. The welcome was given by the host pastor, Rev. Lowell Brown. The moderator recognized messengers and visitors and extended appreciation to the host church for their gracious hospitality in preparing for the meeting.

3. Rev. Charles Lassiter moved that the printed order of business, with any necessary changes, be adopted as the program. Motion adopted.

9. Rev. Allen Schuyler presented the Campus Ministries Report. He asked that churches with students on campuses send in the name and address to the Student Campus Ministry Department of our convention.

10. Dr. Wayne Adams gave the Church Training Report, encouraging participation of our people in Church Training programs, and appealed to churches without Church Training programs to initiate program of training. Help is available from the convention and the association.

11. Dr. Fleet Allen gave the General Board Report. He mentioned that Dr. Roy Smith had been nominated to the convention to become secretary-treasurer of the convention, succeeding Dr. Cecil Ray, and that Mr. Curt Bettini was elected as a General Board member at large from our district.

12. During miscellaneous business, Mr. Risder Bennett, newly elected Children's Home representative, shared some important information concerning the Cameron Boys Home. He introduced Mr. Buford "Chief Mc" McKenzie, director of the local home, and told how our churches could help meet needs of the boys in therapeutic camping at the home. A list of needs was distributed. There was some lively discussion as to how churches could help meet the needs.

13. Rev. Allen Schuyler mentioned that Dr. Roy Smith would be guest speaker at the upcoming November Pastors' Conference. Laymen were invited to attend that day.

14. Rev. Booker led in singing the hymn, "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

15. The Eastern Gate Singers of Ephesus presented special music, singing four numbers. Mrs. Judy Allen, choir director of Ephesus, led the singers in the time of inspiration before the evening message.

16. Rev. J. Billy Graham introduced Dr. Robert Newton, Director of the Family Life Department of the Baptist State Convention, who brought an inspiring address on the family, using the theme, "Developing Believers Through God's Family."

17. Rev. Lowell Brown, host pastor, led in the closing prayer and benediction. Unity Grove Church invited all messengers and guests to remain for fellowship and refreshments, which was enjoyed by all.

October 23, 1984 - Carthage First Baptist
AFTERNOON SESSION

1. Moderator Eugene Payne called the session to order at 4:00 p.m.
2. With Mrs. Gay Boroughs at the piano, Rev. Gene Booker led in singing "Great Is Thy Faithfulness." Rev. Ray Holland, pastor of Pleasant Hill Church, gave the devotional from Ephesians 4.
3. The host pastor, Rev. Allen Schuyler, gave a cordial welcome to all present.
4. Rev. Allen Schuyler gave the Seminary Extension Report, stating that the committee had met several times during the past year, according to requests from participants, and studied the possibility of conducting seminary extension classes at one or more locations in the association. The committee recommended Rev. Rick Hodges, pastor of Taylor Memorial Church, to serve as Seminary Extension Director. There is a possibility that one or more classes can be given as early as January 1985.
5. Rev. Robert Morrison gave the Missions Department Report, stressing the development of a Steering Committee from 12 churches and the New Work Committee, that would help develop and establish a new mission church in Seven Lakes. Churches not yet sending a representative to the Steering Committee were invited to participate. The committee is now interviewing church planters in view of calling a church planter to lead in the work at Seven Lakes.
6. Rev. Charles Hinson gave the Nominating Committee Report. It was noted that an Evangelism Director would be nominated at a later date. It was moved and adopted that all officers be elected as presented.
7. Rev. Gene Booker gave the Stewardship Report, emphasizing Planned Growth in Giving and stating the Dr. Cecil Ray was present and would give information on this very important stewardship emphasis in our convention.
8. In the absence of Mrs. Daphne Leonard, Mrs. Lela Russell of Taylor Memorial Church, gave the Library Media Report.
9. Mr. Eddie Baggett gave the Music Report for Rev. Rick Downing, who had moved to another association.
10. With the retirement of Rev. Bennie Maness, Rev. Max Gilmore gave the Credentials Committee Report.
11. In preparation for the annual sermon, Rev. Charles Hinson, read Scripture from Acts 4 and led in prayer. Rev. Jesse Mansfield brought an inspiring message to the association, calling us to integrity and harmony in our relationships in the association and convention.
12. Rev. Gene Booker led in singing the hymn, "Fairest, Lord Jesus."
13. The Memorial Service was conducted by Rev. John Stone.
14. There was no miscellaneous business. The moderator announced that 96 messengers and 17 visitors were present, with more expected for the evening session.
15. Rev. Gene Booker introduced Dr. Cecil Ray, former Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Southern Baptist Convention, who delivered an excellent, challenging message on commitment to meet the needs and goals projected in Bold Mission Thrust. Dr. Ray challenged us to greater support of the Cooperative Program which undergirds all Southern Baptist work and ministry around the world.
16. Rev. Allen Schuyler, host pastor, offered thanks to God for the meal and invited messengers and visitors to a delicious meal, enjoyed by all, served in the fellowship hall.

EVENING SESSION

1. The evening session was called to order by Moderator Eugene Payne. Rev. Gene Booker led in the hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story." Rev. David Helms, minister of education, Southern Pines Church, gave the devotion from II Corinthians 5:17.
2. During the miscellaneous business, Rev. Gene Booker asked that Rev. and Mrs. J. Billy Graham come to the platform and announced the gift to the Grahams of a January Bible Cruise to the Caribbean. A letter expressing love and appreciation for over five

years of faithful service to the association by the Grahams, explained that the expenses of the cruise, including the plane fare to Miami would be given. The Grahams accepted the generous gift with gratitude.

3. Mrs. G.P. Jones, association historian, mentioned that some churches did not get in their church history in time for the Book of Reports, and that there would be additions to Pleasant Hill and Red Branch history reports, which would be included in the minutes. Churches were encouraged to keep accurate histories and send them to the historian each year. Each church should have their minutes and other historical data microfilmed by the Wake Forest Historical Commission, free of charge.

4. Dr. Wayne Adams moved support of the Cameron Boys Home: "Recognizing the importance of the work of Cameron Home in the ministry as a part of the Baptist Children's Home, and recognizing its presence in the Sandhills Baptist Association, and in fact an integral part of our mission to strengthen the minds of young people, I move that our association express our support of the program and authorize the Associational Board, on the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the association, to develop a program with the Cameron Boys Home, involving all of the churches in our association." Ridsen Bennett and Buford McKenzie and others spoke to the motion, which was unanimously adopted.

5. Rev. James Sauls of the Baptist Retirement Homes, Inc. extended greetings and spoke briefly about the ministry of the retirement homes of our convention.

6. Rev. Ray Holland announced the upcoming Sunday School Growth Clinic, to be held at Aberdeen First Church, November 1, 9:30 to noon, with meal to be served.

7. Rev. Rick Hodges gave the Sunday School Report, requesting support of the new Sunday School director.

8. Mr. Lane Hall gave the Brotherhood Report, expressing appreciation to Mr. Jimmy Melton, president of the Brotherhood, and to Mr. Jack Robinson, R.A. director.

9. Mrs. Fay Boroughs presented the WMU Report, encouraging support and involvement of all missions causes, sponsored by the association and convention.

10. Dr. Fleet Allen gave the Treasurer's Report, which was adopted as given.

11. Mr. Glen Crissman gave the Finance Budget Report and stated that he had audited the treasurer's records for the past year. He commended the treasurer for excellent work. The budget was adopted as presented.

12. The Place and Preacher Report was adopted as printed in the program.

13. Rev. Don Hays gave the Evangelism Report, mentioning the "Good News, America" Crusade in the spring of 1986. Dates for Sandhills are May 23-30, 1986. Churches are encouraged to give much attention to preparation during 1985.

14. The Resolution Report, given by Mrs. Gail Little, was adopted.

15. In the absence of the chairman, Mr. Tommy McKenzie, the Committee on Committees Report given by Mr. William Matthews, was adopted as presented.

16. Using a towel as a symbol of servitude, Rev. Allen Schuyler led in the installation of association officers for 1984-85. Each officer was given a small piece of towel as a reminder that they are servants like our Lord served us. Rev. J. Billy Graham led in the prayer of dedication.

17. The hymn, "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations," was led by the Rev. Gene Booker.

18. Rev. J. Billy Graham introduced the missionary speakers for the closing message, personal friends, Dr. and Mrs. Jack Gentry, who served with the Grahams in Taiwan, with the Foreign Mission Board. Rev. Gentry spoke and showed slides of work in Taiwan, China, challenging us to be personally involved in using our gifts in witness and service for our Lord Jesus Christ. Dr. Gentry used as his text, Acts 4:31 and Ephesians 4:7-11. A special appeal was made to pastors who possibly could go as preachers to a foreign people where the need of preachers is so great.

19. Moderator Eugene Payne announced that the association would meet in 1985 with the Beaver Creek Baptist Church, October 21, and with the Ephesus Baptist Church, October 22. A motion was made for adjournment, with the Rev. Michael Ray, former director of missions, leading in the closing prayer.

V. Officer's Reports

1. Director of Missions Report

September 1, 1984, marked the fifth anniversary of my ministry as your missionary. As then, I continue to put priority on evangelism, missions, Christian education, and benevolence, in carrying out our Lord's Great Commission to the ends of the earth. Thank you for five good years of sharing in Christian work and ministry, for your prayers and love.

Our pastors are called on for ministry in so many ways. During the past five years, pastoral changes have occurred with 20 of our pastors and two of our associate pastors. Two beloved pastors, Rev. Robert Denton, Ashley Heights, and Rev. Bennie Maness, Pine Grove, retired from many years of faithful and fruitful ministry. Rev. Denton also served well as our McCain Prison chaplain. I thank each of these who served and has moved and each now faithfully serving. Let us hold up our pastors in prayer and strong support.

Our Executive Committee assisted me in developing an excellent calendar for 1984-85. I hope that each pastor and each church leader will keep the calendar at hand and participate in the workshops, programs, and ministries that are projected for the coming year.

I try to work closely with our pastorless churches. Presently seven churches - Beaver Creek, Bethlehem, Ashley Heights, Middle Cross, Fairview, Pine Grove, and Ives Memorial - are seeking a pastor. We pray that by our annual meeting next year each of these churches will have called strong, spirit-filled servants of the Lord to lead them.

My wife and I prepared studies for the association, state, home, and foreign mission weeks of prayer. In addition to supply and other preaching, I preached one revival, served as camp missionary for one association and assisted Pee Dee Association in their World Missions Conference.

This year I attended our state and national conventions, Evangelism Conference, Director of Missions Conference and brief seminars that provided information and resource material to help me better do my work in the association. We in the Southern Baptist Convention, work together as God's servants to do multiple kinds of ministries and mission work. The Cooperative Program is still the best method of support for our missionaries and in meeting the needs of our institutions and agencies.

I commend our churches for the generous response in sending over \$20,000.00 for tornado disaster relief for needy families in our state.

Our office sends about 600 copies of *The Spotlight* to pastors, church key leaders, and other members. Sometime in between the newsletter mailing, I send an informational *Leadership Update* to key leaders. Further, our office assists churches with need in copy and mimeograph work. Churches that desire may order paper at our contract price.

Our association sponsored three major projects this year: (1) The World Missions Conference in cooperation with Pee Dee Association, with 6,856 in total attendance, four professions of faith, four mission volunteers, 33 rededications, (2) The Youth Choir Musical and Backyard Bible Schools in four places, and (3) The Seven Lakes Mission Project to start a church at Seven Lakes, with the organization of a Steering Committee composed of representatives from 12 churches, and New Work Committee which sent out a mailing to over 500 families at Seven Lakes, and will interview a church planter. Let us pray that God will be with us in a great way in 1984-85. It is a joy to serve as your missionary.

4. General Board Report

The General Board meets quarterly to perform the business of the Baptist State Convention between annual meetings. Dr. Cecil Ray, general secretary-treasurer of the Baptist State Convention, resigned effective January 1, 1984. A Search Committee was appointed to find the Lord's man for the general secretary-treasurer position. The Search Committee recommend Dr. Roy Smith for the position. The General Board of the Baptist State Convention on September 25, 1984, unanimously accepted the recommendation, sending the nomination of Dr. Smith to the State Convention in November for election.

Members of the General Board dedicated a new addition to the Caraway Conference Center on September 25, 1984. The 22,000 square feet addition includes 33 new bedrooms and four conference rooms. The addition was constructed at a cost of approximately \$800,000.00.

The General Board approved a 24 million dollar base budget for 1985 to be sent to the State Convention in Asheville for adoption. The new budget is 4.3 percent increase over the 1984 budget requirements. In dollars, the increase represents a million dollar jump over the 1984 budget.

Rev. Richard Smith, director of the General Board's business management division, reported that as of September 22, 1984, gifts through the Cooperative Program were up 7.53 percent over the same time last year. Total Cooperative Program receipts were \$15,926,905.00, or \$1,222,137, as of that date, ahead of last year. Foreign mission gifts were up seven percent; home mission gifts were up 14 percent; and North Carolina Mission gifts were down seven percent as of this date. Smith reports no external debts by the State Baptist Convention.

The General Board operates through 10 operational committees: Business Management, Church Programs, Communications, Evangelism, Missions, Stewardship, Youth and Camps, Christian Higher Education, Christian Life, and Social Ministries. The General Board is divided into these committee groups to study and make recommendations on programs for our Baptist State Convention. This gives each member a chance to become involved in the development of programs of their interests and abilities.

1. Brotherhood Department

Baptist Men and R.A.'s promote mission education and involve men and boys in missions in local, state and missions elsewhere.

Dr. Jack Robinson is doing a good job as associational R.A. director, and Mr. Jimmy Melton is serving well as Baptist Men's president. Our leadership has attended various training sessions, board meetings, etc. at Caraway and elsewhere, equipping ourselves.

In October 1983, we conducted an associational workshop at Pleasant Hill for all leadership of Baptist Men and R.A.'s, with good attendance from across the association. On August 20, we had an associational rally at Beulah Hill for both Baptist Men and R.A.'s, with watermelon cutting following. An excellent program on mission action was presented by two guests on the program from Asheboro - Mrs. Delores Crutchfield and Mrs. Janice Chrisco. A slide presentation on lay revival in Ohio in April and a week in June in St. Louis, was given by Lane Hall. Our men have been involved in various mission work locally, and with various needs in the community.

In October 1983, we took an art teacher and two of her 14-year-old students to Old Fields, West Virginia. They painted a lovely scene of the Jordan River over the baptistry that our association had bought and installed earlier with your love gifts. The water system is now in operation and the Sunday School that we helped renovate is being used.

Each church is encouraged to develop a Baptist Men and R.A. program.

3. Evangelism Department

As your evangelism director for this past year, I would like to share with all of you this touching story. It was published in "Every Member Evangelism," by Rev. J. Fish.

"A fearful storm came suddenly one day and struck the grain crop of a local farmer. His crop was indeed a splendid crop. Other crops all about had already been harvested before this awful storm struck, but his could not be harvested for the lack of help.

"The owner of this splendid grain crop stood next to his fence after the storm had passed. As he looked out across his field he saw the remains of his ruined crop and his face was one of sadness and dejection.

"A stranger walking along the road came to where the farmer was standing and stood next to him in silence. Then the stranger said, 'It's a pretty sad sight to look upon, isn't it?' The farmer said, 'You would think it was sad if it was your crop that laid destroyed in this field.'

" 'Why didn't you harvest it before the storm came?' asked the stranger. 'Because I couldn't get any harvesters,' was the farmers reply. Slowly with heavy shoulders, the farmer turned and walked away from his lost crop."

How sad it would be for us to let the lost be struck by the storm of judgment without a chance to be harvested. Jesus said, "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few. Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth laborers into the harvest." (Matt. 9:37-38)

3. Join with Southern Baptists throughout the world in a united effort to reach people for Christ through Witness Training Programs in our churches for our people.
4. To start making preparations now for "Good News America," nationwide simultaneous revival during the spring of 1986. Dates for "Good News America, God Loves You," revivals will take place in the association churches on March 23-30, 1986. Churches are encouraged to plan well ahead now to engage an evangelist for this nationwide revival.
5. During the entire year of 1985, preparation will be made to inform each of our churches about the revival.

5. Missions Department

The Associational Board, February 16, 1984 at Pine Grove Church, voted for the association to form a Steering Committee to direct the proposed Seven Lakes Mission project. The Steering Committee would be composed of one representative from each participat-

ing church. From the Steering Committee, a New Work Committee of three persons would be selected. It would be the responsibility of the Steering Committee to communicate with each church represented on the committee. The New Work Committee's responsibility is to guide the mission project in laying the groundwork toward calling a church planter.

The Board further moved to have all monies for the Seven Lakes Project kept under this item by the associational treasurer. The association at the 1983 annual meeting voted to designate \$6,000.00 to the Seven Lakes Project. Each church was encouraged to elect a representative for this project. The representatives were to be elected by March 19, 1984. A called meeting of the Steering Committee was announced soon thereafter.

The Steering Committee met at Carthage, May 29, 1984, to plan mission strategy for developing a mission at Seven Lakes. Rev. Robert Morrison, director of our Missions Department, was elected chairman of the Steering Committee. Our director of missions, J. Billy Graham, was selected to chair the New Work Committee, a subcommittee of the Steering Committee. Twelve persons were present for this first meeting. Nine churches out of 20 were represented (1/3). Glen McNeil, Ives; Leland Strother and David Schuchard, Ashley Heights; James Talbert, Pleasant Hill; Lester Haywood, Bethlehem; Clyde Burge, Ephesus; Wade Short and Allen Schuyler, Carthage; John Stone, Southern Pines; Karl Loving, Cameron; Sam Hartsell, Taylor Memorial; Robert Morrison and J. Billy Graham.

The following were elected to the Work Committee: J. Billy Graham, chairman, Clyde Burge, Sam Hartsell and Wade Short.

The Work Committee prepared a letter and mailed it to each resident of Seven Lakes. Enclosed was a self-addressed card for the resident to fill out and mail back if they were interested in becoming or not becoming a part of the new Seven Lakes Church.

A called meeting of the Steering Committee was held in Carthage with the Work Committee giving the results of the survey and a recommendation. The Steering Committee voted to proceed with calling a church planter. Interviews are now being conducted to call a church planter.

Churches with funds allocated for this project are encouraged to be sending them in now. We would further urge churches that do not have a representative on the Steering Committee to elect such a person and have your church represented at the next Steering Committee meeting.

The Mission Department of the Sandhills Baptist Association would like to thank each church that so willingly responded to human needs as a result of the tornado disaster in our state this spring. Some \$20,000.00 was given in love to assist these victims.

We end this report with this reminder: The individual is responsible for his own giving, time, talent, money, and self. The congregation places a claim on the individual. The world places a claim on the whole church, we are debtors to the world in and through the church.

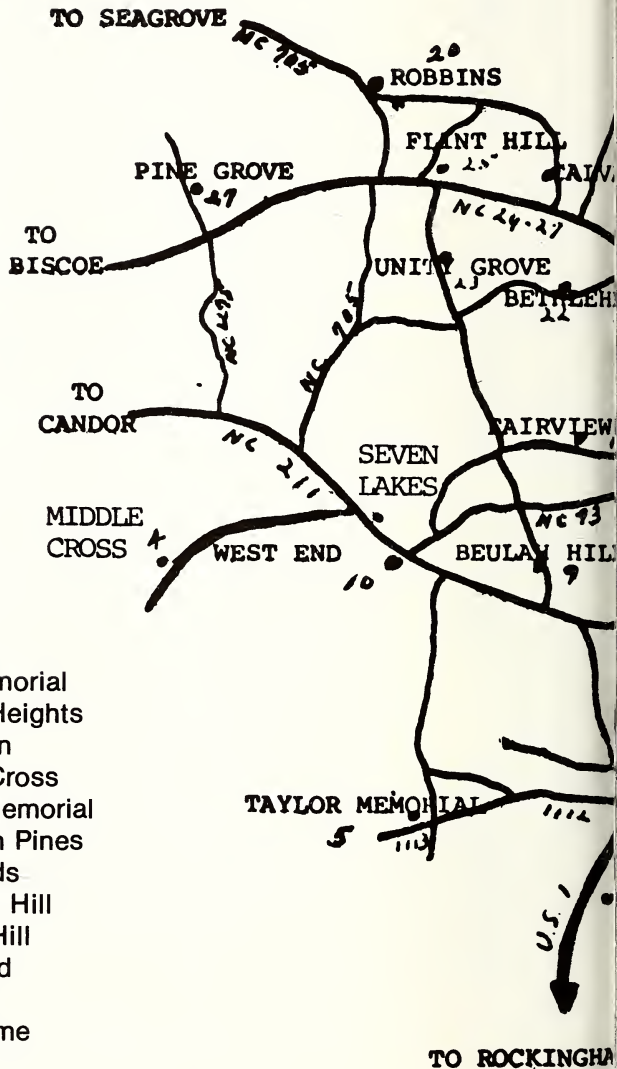

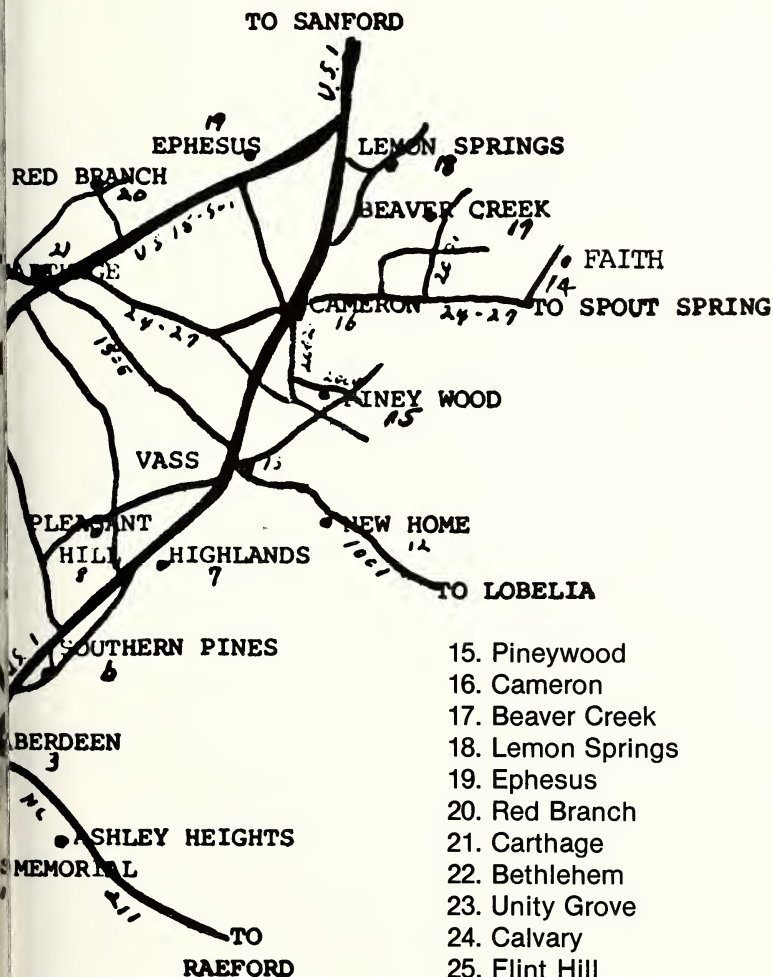
7. Senior Adult Department

2. Baptist Hospital

During the past year Baptist Hospital admitted 24,577 patients for a total of 218,735 days of patient care. There were 211,547 outpatient clinic visits and 31,930 visits to the emergency room. Surgical procedures totaled 11,816 including 700 open heart operations and 20 kidney transplants.

Several clinical advances during the past year serve as examples of the hospital's quality of care. (1) Neurosurgeons have developed a new procedure for treating head injuries which has resulted in our having the lowest mortality rate for patients with this type of injury of any major medical center in the world. (2) Improvements in perinatal care with special emphasis on prevention of preterm labor have resulted in a lower infant mortality rate and in a 15 percent reduction in the number of babies in Forsyth County needing to be admitted to the intensive care nursery. (3) A new treatment offers relief

without surgery for many patients suffering from ruptured vertebral discs. (4) Many patients with kidney stones should benefit from the use of new equipment being acquired in the section on urology. It uses ultrasound to break up stones of the urinary tract so that, in many instances, surgery is not necessary.

The School of Pastoral Care during the past year provided clinical pastoral education to 276 ministers through 47 clinical-pastoral programs. Chaplains in the Department of Pastoral Care made more than 33,000 visits to patients, families of patients, and hospital staff. The department also provided more than 20,000 hours of pastoral counseling at its various centers in Winston-Salem, Fayetteville, Raleigh, Morganton, and Charlotte. This program was supported in part from gifts through the Cooperative Program which amounted to \$515,556 during the past year. Dr. J. Dewey Hobbs began his work on March 15 as the new director of the Department of Pastoral Care.

The hospital received \$351,801 through the North Carolina Missions Offering during the fiscal year. A total of 418 patients received financial assistance on their bills through this fund. These bills ranged in size from \$20 to \$21,000. The Baptist Hospital is grateful for your prayers and continuing support.

3. Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc.

We express appreciation to you, North Carolina Baptists, for your faithful support of the Retirement Homes. From October 1983 - April 1984, you gave 26.3 percent of the Homes total income through your Cooperative Program, North Carolina Missions Offering and special gifts. Benevolent care projections for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1984, are running at about \$1,000,000. Mission gifts, it appears, will fall short of the need by \$250,000. Currently, approximately 40 percent of the residents in the five Homes are able to cover their full cost of care. Mission gifts are vital to the benevolent care ministry of the Retirement Homes.

The trustees are your voice in overall operations of the Homes' ministry. A Capital Funds Campaign has been launched - "A Call to Remember . . ." The trustees are preparing a Search Committee to locate my successor upon my retirement in October 1985. The names of the Homes were changed to Retirement Homes in 1983, recommended by the trustees and approved by the convention.

Operating expenses for the Homes' ministry increased approximately three percent during the 1983 fiscal year. This includes support of staff and 220 employees, which are so important to all the ministry in the Homes.

Fred Lovette, retired president and chairman of the board for Holly Farms, serves unselfishly in pulling together key leaders across North Carolina in formulating an advisory team and leadership to raise 2½ million dollars through the "A Call to Remember . . ." Campaign.

Life expectancy figures indicate that the Homes can anticipate providing approximately eight years of care for 80-year-old residents. The growing segment of our population is the 65 plus group. We want to continue our 33-year tradition of helping meet the needs of our older population. Please feel free to call us to discuss ways that we can work effectively together in ministry for our Lord.

4. *The Biblical Recorder*

History was made last year when the *Biblical Recorder*, fourth oldest of the 35 state Baptist papers in the Southern Baptist Convention, celebrated 150 years of Baptist papers in North Carolina. And history was made again in 1984 when for the first time in more than 72 years, the *Recorder* moved into its own building, becoming the fourth state paper to have its own building.

In February 1912, the *Recorder* moved into its own building in the heart of Raleigh. In July 1984, the paper moved into its own building in the middle of one of the fastest growing areas of the capital city. Coming to Raleigh in 1838 from New Bern, the *Recorder* is the oldest business in Raleigh and exceeded in terms of operations in Raleigh only by Brown-Wynne Funeral Home which began in 1836.

The business of the *Biblical Recorder* is the Lord's business! Since it was founded by Thomas Meredith, the Baptist paper of North Carolina has been committed to the advancement of the Kingdom of God as Baptists coordinate their resources to spread the Gospel to the ends of the earth. The purpose of the *Recorder* is to inform, indoctrinate, enlist, inspire and provide a forum for unity in the fellowship as we fulfill the Great Commission.

For the third consecutive year, subscription rates will NOT be raised. In 1982, a gigantic increase in the cost of second-class postage (260 percent) necessitated the increase in subscription rates but now that the rates have moderated some (they are still 80 percent higher than 1981) and the new *Biblical Recorder* Building was entered debt-free, the paper will hold the line on subscription rates. We want to make it as easy as possible for churches to send the paper to every family.

Never has there been a greater time than now when Baptists needed to be well informed. There is so much misinformation, exploitation and manipulation in our time that Baptists need a source of news that can be trusted to present facts as they are available and apply them to the betterment, not the harm, of Baptists.

There are tensions in the Baptist family, partly produced by the world conditions in which we operate, and Baptists need a forum where differing views can be expressed. Many so-called Baptist papers provide only one point of view; they do not permit an exchange of ideas and perspectives. The *Biblical Recorder* does and must always serve all the Baptists of our fellowship.

"Every true Baptist believer a faithful *Recorder* reader" sounds like an impossible dream, but we have set that as a goal for the ministry of the paper, which from its beginning was designed to serve the cause of Christ by serving all of His people, not just a limited few. We are grateful for the support we have received across the years and request your continued prayers, support and readership. We continue our march toward making the *Biblical Recorder* the best state Baptist paper in the Southern Baptist Convention. Tar Heel Baptists deserve no less!

The Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc. had its beginning 99 years ago on the Mills Home campus. Preparation is already underway to celebrate 100 years of quality child care in 1985. A tradition of caring and love was begun in 1885 and continues today.

At the very heart of child care is love. That is a simple statement to make. However, for a child to feel and understand love is a far more complex undertaking. It really is done best by the people who live with them daily, the cottage parent. They make the difference in a child's life. We are blessed with staff members who feel it is a real privilege to share their life and love with children, making quality child care possible.

Through members of our social work staff, services are provided to families in a good and efficient manner.

Emergency Care is available in High Point and on the Mills Home campus.

Therapeutic camping at Cameron Home continues to grow in quality. It is operating with three groups of 10 boys each providing interest group work to help boys from 11 to 15 years of age in a year-round therapeutic setting.

Group care at Mills Home and foster care continue to be used in an effective way in service to families.

All services of the Baptist Children's Homes are available through the staff of the Thomasville Family Services Center. These services include: group living on four campuses, foster care, therapeutic camping, camping, maternity care, emergency care,

social work service, care for children in need of specialized assistance, college and technical education, a demonstrational program of preschool child care and development; counseling and professional services to families, and assistance to churches and associations in parent education and family living through the Family Resource Center.

During the Centennial Celebration you can be a part by:

- (1) Praying for the trustees, administration and staff that we might meet the challenges of the future in Family Services.
- (2) Consider serving as a foster parent or child care worker in one of our facilities.
- (3) Giving to undergird the program through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering.

A mission team of eight youth and three adults went to Skygusty, West Virginia, July 8-14, 1984 to conduct Vacation Bible School and Backyard Bible Clubs. Commission service held at Sunday morning worship service for mission team before departure on the eighth. Pastor Charles Hinson was honored on the occasion of his 30th anniversary of ordination into the ministry during the Sunday morning worship service, August 26, 1984. A scrapbook, Bible and a generous love offering was presented to Mr. and Mrs. Hinson. A Day Care Program for children, ages 2-4, was begun September 4, 1984. The program operates Tuesday - Thursday, 9:00 - 11:45 a.m.

BETHLEHEM: The World Mission Conference (October 30-November 2) was a great inspiration to the church. After Mrs. Hill, missionary to Nigeria, spoke on Sunday morning, many former members joined the congregation for a fellowship meal. Each evening a different group from the W.M.U. and Sunday School prepared a meal for the guest missionary. Mr. David Early, from Sanford, conducted a week of workshop training sessions with our church choir. A Christmas play entitled, "The Visiting King," was well presented by 26 adults and youth. In February, the Baptist Women sponsored a Valentine Banquet

for the G.A.'s and their mothers. Mrs. Mike Ray was the guest speaker. Rev. and Mrs. Billy Graham taught the foreign and home mission studies. A group of 54 youth and adults enjoyed a bus trip and a day of recreation at Morrow Mt. State Park. The church responded to the needs of Red Springs and the Burnt Swamp Association in the tornado disaster area by sending \$4,300, and some went to help clean up. Our pastor, Rev. John Mullinax, resigned and left in June to accept a church at Spring Lake. Rev. Marion Parker from Troy is interim pastor. A Prayer Garden is under construction on the site where the old church burned. (Geneva Gordon, historian)

CALVARY: We completed work on our new fellowship hall. This new building has already been used several times. Our pastor, Rev. Eldon Hinegardner, enrolled as a student at Campbell University. (Mrs. Arthur Brewer, historian)

CARTHAGE: During the year 1983 - 1984 an action of historical significance for Carthage First Baptist Church was the adoption of a constitution. As far as is known this is the first time the church has had a constitution during its 126-year history. Deacons first gave approval to the document and then it was presented to the full church membership where it was unanimously approved. The deacons carried out some discussion on a constitution and it was decided there was a real need for such a document, and a special committee was named to draw it up. That committee worked long and hard in drawing up a constitution before it was submitted to the church for a vote. Last year saw a long-time landmark of the church pass from the scene, when the old parsonage that was constructed in 1912 was torn down. The location where it stood next to the church on McNeill Street is now being used as a parking area. In 1979 a new parsonage was constructed in the Edgehill Parkway development. A successful revival was held in May with guest minister being Rev. Boyce Brooks of Roxboro, who brought inspiring messages each night. During the revival special music was presented by the church choir and other groups. (Woodrow Wilhoit, church clerk)

EPHESUS: This year at Ephesus has been a year of growth, implementing new programs and completing established goals. On May 27, 1984 during the morning worship services, the new fellowship hall-education building was dedicated to the service of our Lord. Rev. Gene Puckett, editor of the *Biblical Recorder*, was the speaker and Rev. J. Billy Graham participated. Following the service about 200 people enjoyed an old fashioned pig-picking. In November 1983, a youth-led revival was held by the Gardner Webb College team. A Campbell University student group presented a musical program for the entire church. Among other musical groups enjoyed each month were Danny and the Ambassadors' own newly formed musical group. The musical group from Ephesus has been engaged by several churches and has conducted musical programs in prisons and nursing homes, an excellent evangelistic outreach ministry. Mrs. Judy Allen, music director, wrote and presented an outdoor Christmas Pageant that was well attended during the holiday season. The pageant was presented at two nursing homes in Sanford. The Ephesus choir received an advanced music award from the State Baptist Convention Music Department. In January 1984, Ephesus began a message to the young during the morning worship hour, conducted by Clifton Ayers. Phillip Townsend, summer youth worker, returned to Ephesus for the second summer. Phillip worked under the direction of Mr. Jim Perry, the youth director at Ephesus. Our youth enjoyed another week at Caswell. Mr. Rick Traylor conducted a youth leadership program in April for all youth workers. White Hill Presbyterian, Center Methodist, and Ephesus Baptist participated in the second Christian Renewal Services in July. Through a joint effort of these three churches, the Lee County Council on Aging is sponsoring a Senior Citizens Center, located in the Ephesus Fellowship Building. Meals will be served Monday through Friday. Crafts, arts, Bible study, and many other programs will be provided. We feel that this Center will be a great asset to our community. Mrs. Viola Bowlin and Mrs. Pauline Morrison were elected co-directors of a newly formed senior citizens group at Ephesus. Nine of our young people were baptized this year. This represents a total of 17 young people baptized in 18 months. (Viola Bowlin, historian)

LEMON SPRINGS: God has continued to bless our church in 1984. We observed a "Week of Prayer" for both foreign and home missions, going over our goals with our offerings. Our fall 1983 and spring 1984 revivals were both very stimulating. The men participated in Baptist Men's Day. A brass urn was given to the church during our December 18, 1983, worship service in memory of Susan Darlene Deal by Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Howard and Mr. and Mrs. Terry Ward. March 25, 1984, was observed as Commitment Sunday. It was a time to dedicate our lives, talents, tithes, and time unto our Lord Jesus

Christ. Our church families have been enjoying a series of movies that are taking a realistic view of questions and struggles that virtually touch every family. We are looking forward to this continuing. Our organ fund and our church library are continuing to grow. We look forward to serving God in the coming church year for His glory. (Betty Howard, historian)

PLEASANT HILL: This has been a year of challenge and growth at Pleasant Hill. We began our new church year by calling the Rev. Ray E. Holland of Marion, North Carolina to serve as our pastor. Our annual Christmas play was presented by the young people of the church and was entitled, "The True Meaning of Christmas." The play was well done and very meaningful. The W.M.U. made lap rugs for our shut-in and nursing home members and distributed fruit baskets to the needy. Our Lottie Moon and Annie Armstrong Mission goals were met and exceeded. We enjoyed our Easter Sunrise Service and breakfast again this year. In April, we had a note-burning service to retire the debt on the parsonage which was built in 1978. Extensive work has been done on the grounds at the parsonage under the leadership of Junior Flinchum. Additional clearing of undergrowth, seeding, and planting of shrubs was done. The R.A.'s and their director, Richard Yost, attended Field Day at Pinecrest and won trophies and ribbons. They also spent a week at Camp Caraway. The church observed Youth Sunday in August and the G.A.'s had Christmas in August. Another milestone in the life of our church was reached when a committee was elected to begin construction of a new education building. Committee members are: Roy Reynolds, Richard Yost, Fletcher Garner, Joyce Bobbitt, Phillip Garner, Kay Neff, and Duncan Chisholm. The brick structure will be two stories and contain nine classrooms, a conference room, fellowship hall, and kitchen and restroom facilities. In September, the ground breaking service was held to begin construction. Rev. Holland, Roy Reynolds, and James Talbert used the shovel in the traditional turning of the soil. The fall revival will be held October 8-12. Rev. Tim Lee of Anderson, South Carolina will be the speaker. (Mrs. Kay D. Neff, historian)

RED BRANCH: We received a blessing by joining in with our association in the World Mission Conference. Our speakers were Miss Allie Candler of Independence, Virginia, James Dubose, D.M. of Stone Mt. Association, Atlanta, Georgia, Dr. Paul Johnson, missionary to the Philippines, R. Victor Watts, missionary to Bophuthatswana, and Mrs. Patricia Ann Baden of Oakdale, Louisiana. Bill and Fran Ladd made public their decision to answer the Lord's call into the mission field. Each one of our W.M.U. organizations, the R.A.'s, and the youth group participated in visiting our area nursing homes and making Christmas a joy to the patients. The B.Y.W. took as their project a Clothes Closet and Food Pantry. Bill Ladd built clothes racks and shelves which we soon filled. From Christmas until spring we helped 22 needy families. Our church assisted in helping our boys and young men organize a softball team. They played well all the summer. On February 15 the Acteen girls held a Sweetheart Banquet. Their invited guests were members of Laides Bible Class I and II and our W.M.U. directors. Our pastor, Donald Hays, is chairman of evangelism in our association. He conducted a workshop February 27 and 28 at our church. He was assisted by Dr. Victor Cole of the State Baptist Convention, and Evangelist Chad Hamilton of Asheville. Our Miracle Sunday was a miracle. We had 277 present in Sunday School. Our offering goal was \$13,000 and we had \$15,000. On March 27 our Acteens went to Beaver Creek for the associational Acteen meeting. We won the certificate for most girls present. Again on March 31 they attended State Mission Day at Campbell College. Paula Yow won an award for being our outstanding Acteen. Rev. Don Sweeny, a former pastor, preached for our Memorial Day service the last Sunday in May. The R.A.'s went to Field Day at Pinecrest School and again won the trophy for highest points in activities. Celebration Sunday was September 30. We dedicated our new Sunday School rooms and burned the note. Our offering on Miracle Sunday more than paid our debt. Rev. Robert Stewart of the Sunday School Board of the State Baptist Convention brought the morning sermon. (Cleta Jones, historian)

SOUTHERN PINES: Our senior adults made Chrismons and held a Chrismon Service on Sunday, December 11, 1983. Our spring revival was led by Rev. Jack Partain, who served as a foreign missionary in East Africa for 16 years. The revival was March 4-7. Our Preschool Department was renovated and enlarged in April. A Building Committee was named in April to begin work on a new educational building to house offices, library, and classrooms. The senior adults presented a musical, "Saints Alive," on Sunday, May 20. The church library conducted a summer reading program during which our children read a total of 1,070 books. We held a very successful Vacation Bible School July 9-13. A Long-

Range Planning Committee was established. They are in the process of making a comprehensive study as to the goals of our church over the next 5-10 years. (Myra Robinson, church clerk)

TAYLOR MEMORIAL: A group of young people from Wingate College came and spent one weekend at our church during the year. They gave a skit, had Youth Day, and conducted the Sunday morning worship service. Work is being done on the cemetery. We are putting cornerstones to all the plots. In September our church had Homecoming Day, celebrating its 60th anniversary. (Sallie Laton, historian)

UNITY GROVE: In the past year at Unity Grove Baptist we have added a new out building and a new riding lawn mower and weedeater. Also, we have a new pastor. He is Rev. Lowell Brown. (Barbara Morgan, church clerk)

VASS: Chapel renovation was completed, including lowering ceiling, installing new windows and siding on outside. The chapel is used for community groups such as Boy and Girl Scouts and AA meetings. During the December Homecoming, senior adults were presented with honorary certificates of recognition. The certificates were framed by the men of the church, using glass removed from the windows of the Chapel. Twenty Bibles were presented to the Cameron Boys Home. Cynthia Spivey was called as music director. Our annual People Appreciation Day was held in May with a Pig Picking at the church. Our youth group enjoyed a weekend retreat at Myrtle Beach under the direction of Mrs. Judy Mansfield, youth director. Renovation continues on the pastorium. (Belinda Hennings, historian)

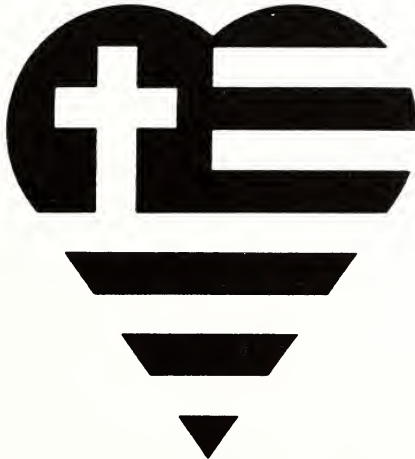

III. Constitution

of the

Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptist.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors, of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

(1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.

(3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.

(4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the

Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognized that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the Association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be *Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, three (3) Trustees, and Director of Missions.*

Section 2. Departments: This Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees - (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and Bylaws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Director of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) *Biblical Recorder*, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issued before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following Bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or Its Bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. *Moderator*

(a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.

(b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.

(c) Shall be an ex officio members of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. *Vice-Moderator:* Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. *Clerk:*

(a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.

(b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.

(c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging the Association.

(d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. *Treasurer:*

(a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.

(b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.

(c) Shall provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational newsletter each month.

(d) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5. *Historian:* Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the members churches and the Association.

Section 6. *Parliamentarian:* Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. *Trustees:* Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. *Director of Missions:*

(a) Search Committee:

1. The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

(b) Conditions of Employment:

1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.

2. Shall have three (3) weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.

3. May be away from the Association for three (3) weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.

4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
5. May serve any church in the Association as Interim pastor for a period not to exceed five (5) Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c). Duties:

1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.
4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.
5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
6. Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
7. Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.

(b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

(a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.

(b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

(a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.

(c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

(a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the members churches and in Association-wide efforts.

(b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.

(c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

(a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

(a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audio-visual aid materials and equipment.

(b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

(a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

(b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.

(c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.

(d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

(a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.

(b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.

(c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.

(d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.

(e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
- (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 12. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
- (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

**ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE
ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES**

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the Association.
- (c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
- (e) The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meetings of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastors' Conference. The Vice Moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department

Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services or services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The Association may amend or alter the Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

Thirty-sixth Annual Session

Sandhills Baptist Association

October 21, 1985
BEAVER CREEK BAPTIST CHURCH

The 36th Annual Session of the Sandhills Baptist Association was called to order by Moderator Eugene Payne, October 21, 1985, at the Beaver Creek Baptist Church. The pianist for the session was Rev. Charles Lassister.

1. The devotion from the Great Commission was given by Rev. Robert Wilson. Mr. Edie Baggett led in singing the opening hymn, "To God Be the Glory."

2. The host pastor, Rev. Bob Schwartz, gave a cordial, warm welcome.

3. Rev. Richard Hopkins, Program Chairman, moved that the printed program and any necessary revision be adopted as the Order of Business.

4. The Moderator recognized messengers and visitors and expressed appreciation to the host church for their gracious hospitality.

5. The Director of Missions recognized all new pastors present: Rev. Bob Schwartz, Beaver Creek; Rev. Gary McNair, Ashley Heights; Rev. James B. Gibson, Carthage, First; Rev. Billy Reynolds, Pine Grove; Rev. Edwin Carroll, Fairview; Rev. Jack Gentry, Bethlehem; Mr. Bruce Hill, Minister of Music and Youth, Aberdeen, First; and Rev. Robert Wilson, Faith.

6. Rev. J. Billy Graham presented the Director of Missions Report, expressing appreciation for generous support by the churches and for the gift of the January Bible Crusade.

7. Mr. Dewitt Purvis gave the Digest of Letters Report, indicating that there was progress in almost every category.

8. Dr. Fleet Allen gave the Treasurer's Report: Total receipts, \$45,469.37; Disbursements, \$41,354.05; Balance in checking, \$8,565.21; Special Funds, \$4,993.82; Certificate of Deposit, \$3,819.23.

9. Dr. Fleet Allen, serving on the Higher Education Council of the General Board, gave his report. Mr. Curtis Bettini, serving on the Business Committee of the General Board representing Region 4, gave his report.

10. The Budget with a total balance of \$42,984 and Special Fund for Seven Lakes Mission Project of \$6,000 as presented by Glen Crissman, chairman, was adopted as given. Mr. Crissman audited the treasurer's records and found them in good order.

11. Rev. Gary McNair gave the Evangelism Report with primary emphasis on preparation and conduct of the Good News, America Crusade of March 23-30, 1986.

12. Rev. Bob Morrison gave the Missions Report, stating that four possible church planters for Seven Lakes had been interviewed this year, and asked for continued prayer as the committee searches into the new year. Rev. Morrison reported that he is working with Rev. Maricio Vargas with the hope of starting a Spanish speaking church for migrants at Ephesus.

13. Rev. Jesse Mansfield presented a recommendation for an amendment to the Constitution and Bylaws, providing for a Pastoral Ministries Department, (Article III, Section 12). The amendment will be voted on the second evening.

14. Rev. Joe Cloonz of the Convention Campus Ministry Department reported briefly on the Baptist Student work and encouraged continued support of Campus ministry at Sandhills Community College.

15. The Moderator recognized Mr. Buford McKenzie, Director, Cameron Boys Home. Rev. David Cannady, Prison Chaplain, Southeastern Region, shared some information on prison ministry and invited our participation in ministry in the area penal institutions. He commended the association for providing ministry to the prisons.

16. During miscellaneous business, Rev. Bob Morrison made the following motion: "Propose that the Moderator appoint a committee of three persons at the Tuesday session for the purpose of conducting a feasibility study concerning the relocation and con-

struction of a new Association Office. It is further proposed that the committee present their findings and recommendations to the Association Board at the September meeting prior to the 1986 annual meeting." Motion approved.

17. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the hymn, "Jesus Is All the World to Me."

18. Mr. Bruce Hill, Minister of Music, Aberdeen First Baptist, led the Aberdeen church choir in singing two special arrangements, very appropriate to the theme "On Mission for Christ," and spiritually uplifting.

19. Rev. Manuel Canup, Director of Missions, Piedmont Baptist Association, brought a dramatic presentation on Rev. Shubal Stearns, an early Baptist leader and founder of the Sandy Creek Baptist Association. The presentation was interesting, informative, inspiring and challenging.

20. Rev. Jack Gentry, pastor, Bethlehem Baptist Church, led in the closing prayer and benediction.

October 22, 1985
EPHESUS BAPTIST CHURCH
AFTERNOON SESSION

1. Moderator Eugene Payne called the session to order. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the hymn, "Standing on the Promises." Rev. James B. Gibson brought the devotion, sharing with us experiences from his youth in using the hoe and ax, and reminding us how important it was that the tools we use be sharpened if we would be effective in God's service.

2. Rev. Robert Morrison, host pastor, extended a cordial welcome, expressing his love and greetings to all.

3. Rev. Richard Hodges stated that there was no Seminary Extension work this past year and invited interested persons to see him or contact the associational office if they are interested in one or more of the Seminary Extension courses. There is a possibility of starting a Seminary Extension class in the local McCain Prison.

4. Rev. David Helms gave the Youth Report stating that many activities of Associational Youth Council and urged each church to send an adult and two youth to the council that meets the third Sunday of each month under the leadership of the new director, Jim Perry of Ephesus.

5. Mrs. Jessica Hales reported on the developing Senior Adult ministry in the association, asking all churches to elect a Senior Adult leader. Five out of 17 pastors present indicated their church had a Senior Adult leader already. Cards were distributed to each church promoting the Senior Adult workshop, "How to Lead Senior Adults," November 4, Cameron.

6. The Credentials Committee had no need to meet this year, so there was no report by this committee.

7. Rev. Ray Holland gave the Sunday School Report, saying that 8 x 5 in '85 was now history and that we are to move on to "10 by '90" (Ten Million in Sunday School by 1990). Rev. Holland praised his ASSISTeam and invited the churches to call on the Sunday School Department for any assistance needed.

8. Dr. Wayne Adams presented the Church Training Report, encouraging support of the new director, Rev. David Helms, and thanking his Enabler Team and the association for several good years in Christian Training with the churches

9. Mr. Eddie Baggett gave the Music Report, stating that the association was moving toward some goals that he had set at the beginning of the year, including training in hymn leading and training for choir members, and encouraging the churches to attend the workshop set for the coming year. He introduced the new director, Mr. Bruce Hill of Aberdeen, who shared some of the details of the upcoming workshops and the organization of an association choir that would practice and sing at the mass meeting for Good News America, God Loves Your Crusade in the spring.

10. The Director of Missions introduced Rev. Michael Ray, Rev. John Moore, Rev. Richard Hopkins, Mr. Don Pittman, Mr. Robert Martin de Sa, five men who had served in Volunteer Missions, who spoke briefly about the mission project in the country where they served. Persons from our churches were encouraged to consider serving on a short term or long term volunteer tour.

11. Rev. Paul Nickens led in a most inspiring, comforting Memorial Service in loving memory of our beloved dead. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in the singing of the hymn, "Face to Face with Christ My Savior."

12. During miscellaneous business, Rev. Jesse Mansfield presented for the second time the proposed amendment on Pastoral Ministries and moved that it be adopted. The amendment was approved and is listed in Article III, Section 12 (Pastoral Ministries Department).

13. Representing the denomination, Mrs. Frances Cook, Baptist Foundation, Baptist State Convention, was introduced by Mrs. Alliene Taylor. She spoke on how Baptists can continue in service to Christ through an endowment or trust by arranging an agreement while one is still alive. The endowment lives on after the death.

14. Rev. Eugene Payne read the scripture from Matthew 17:1-21. Following the special music by Mr. Bruce Hill, accompanied by Mrs. Debra Richardson, Rev. Charles Hinson delivered the annual sermon, "Not on the Mountain, But in the Valley."

15. Rev. Edward Carroll was called upon to give the blessing for the meal and the benediction. The host church served a delicious meal in the new fellowship hall.

EVENING SESSION

16. The Moderator called the closing session to order. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the hymn, "We're Marching to Zion." Rev. Billy Reynolds read the scripture, I Timothy 1:12, brought an inspirational devotion and led in prayer.

17. During miscellaneous business the Moderator appointed a Study Committee as instructed by the association Monday evening: Rev. Max Gilmore, chairman, Mrs. Gloria Holland, and Mr. Jimmy D. Blowe. This will be a feasibility study on the relocation and construction of an associational office. Mr. Buford McKenzie, Director, Cameron Boys Home, was asked to speak briefly on the Boys Home. Mr. McKenzie expressed appreciation for prayers and support and mentioned that \$1,300 would be needed to buy Christmas gifts for boys and staff.

18. The Director of Missions commended the host churches, Beaver Creek and Ephesus for their gracious hospitality and good preparation in receiving the association; gave special recognition to Red Branch, Ephesus and Southern Pines for being highest in baptisms; and special recognition was given to Dr. Fleet Allen, retiring treasurer, Dr. Wayne Adams, new treasurer and for many years Church Training Director, and to Mrs. Clea Jones, retiring historian.

19. Rev. Charles Lassister gave the Place and Preacher Report, stating that the 1986 annual sermon will be brought by Rev. Eldon Hinegardner, with alternate preacher, Rev. Ray Holland and that the places for the 1987 annual meeting would be West End, First, October 19, 7:00 p.m. and Vass, First, October 20, 4:00 p.m.

20. Rev. Edward Carroll in the absence of Mr. Lane Hall gave the Brotherhood Report, encouraging all churches to elect Brotherhood Directors and R.A. leaders, and telling of good Baptist men and boys meetings this past year.

21. The W.M.U. Report was given by Mrs. Fay Boroughs, who emphasized the 100th Anniversary Celebration for Women's Missionary Union.

22. Dr. Wayne Hicks gave the Committee on Committees Report which was adopted as presented.

23. In the absence of Mrs. Teresa McKenzie, the Director of Missions asked for a motion from the floor to receive the Nominating Committee Report. It was moved and approved as given in the Book of Reports.

24. Mrs. Gloria Williams presented the Resolutions Report which was received as presented, with one correction: the name Rev. Robert Wilson instead of the name Rev. Eugene Payne for the Monday evening devotion.

25. Mrs. Lois McKenzie of the Cameron Boys Home led in a very meaningful Installation Service of the new officers. Each officer was given an arrow symbolizing the direction of leadership as Christ directs in serving. Rev. J. Billy Graham offered the prayer of dedication.

26. The movie, "Design for Hope," produced by Rev. Zeb Moss, missionary to Africa, was enjoyed.

27. A congregational hymn, "Because He Lives," was led by Mr. Eddie Baggett.

28. Rev. and Mrs. Tony Hardin, accompanied by Mrs. Jan Williams, sang "To Obey Is Better Than Sacrifice," in preparation for the closing message by Dr. Michael Blackwell who spoke on "Ministry and Mission for Christ" with the text taken from Luke 19:1-10. Dr. Blackwell was introduced by the moderator. Dr. Blackwell, a former Carthage First pastor, shared in his message the need for ministering to the hurts of all kinds of people. As president of the Baptist Children's Home of North Carolina, Dr. Blackwell said that the ministry of the homes is to minister to the hurts that all the children have that go to the Baptist Homes. Dr. Blackwell presented the new book, "A Hundred Years of Caring," to the Director of Missions who will place the book for all to use in the associational office.

29. The moderator announced that there were 150 present at Beaver Creek and 163 at Ephesus, of which 148 were registered messengers.

30. The newly elected moderator, Attorney Bill Bost, member of Beulah Hill Baptist Church, made a brief statement of his assuming this office, and led in the closing prayer and benediction. The association was adjourned until the convening of the 37th annual meeting at Middle Cross and Pineywood.

V. Officer's Reports

1. Director of Missions Report

Since 1976 and the beginning of Bold Mission Thrust, Southern Baptists have increased in many areas of ministry: 1,667 new churches, 3,064,616 more baptisms, 398,962 more in Sunday School enrollment, 116.51% in missions and benevolences, 1,231 more Home Missionaries for total of 4,868, 788 more Foreign Missionaries for a total of 3,488; 21 more countries with missionaries for a total of 105 countries. Bold Missions emphases - Reaching People, Developing Believers, and Strengthening Missions - is a serious effort to carry out the Great Commission.

Much preparation is needed as we prepare for the "Good News, America, God Loves You" Simultaneous Crusade, nationwide in the spring of 1986. Let us give attention to Prayer, People Search, Lay Witness training, discipleship training of the new converts as we look to the revivals of March 23-30, 1986 in the Sandhills.

The Executive Committee and Associational Board transacted several important items of associational business. The Associational Calendar of Events was presented at the May Board meeting in order for our churches to have available dates for early church planning.

Continue to pray for the Seven Lakes Mission Project. The New Work Committee interviewed four possible church planters this year and searched for just the right pastor to lead that strategic work.

We are pleased to welcome several new pastors and staff persons to ministry in the association: Rev. and Mrs. Don Ballenger, Ives Memorial; Rev. and Mrs. Roy Barbee, Middle Cross; Rev. and Mrs. Edwin Carroll, Fairview; Rev. and Mrs. Jack Gentry, Bethlehem; Rev. and Mrs. James B. Gibson, Carthage; Rev. and Mrs. Bob Schwartz, Beaver Creek; Rev. and Mrs. Billy Reynolds; Rev. and Mrs. Tony Hardin, Music and Youth, Robbins; Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Hill, Music and Youth, Aberdeen; and Rev. and Mrs. Gary McNair, Ashley Heights. It is good that we have several mature, experienced pastors in the area for supply and interim work. Rev. Michael Ray, Rev. Paul Nickens, Rev. Robert Wilson, Rev. Joe Watterson, Rev. Robert Denton, Rev. Marion Parker, Rev. Bennie Manness are retired ministers that we call upon frequently. Rev. Richard Hopkins, Rev. Bryson Bigby, Dr. Leroy Dare and Rev. William Dunkle also are available for pulpit supply. We appreciate the ministries of Rev. Willie Bryant, founding pastor of Faith Baptist, and Rev. Gene Booker, pastor at Robbins for 18 years. Rev. Booker served as a former moderator and Stewardship Director and in several other offices in the association. Remember Faith and Robbins churches during the interim and Rev. Bryant and Rev. Booker in their new ministries.

Most every department conducted a workshop and some two or more in 1984-85. We are grateful for excellent associational leadership and for the good response to the workshops and conferences.

A full-time chaplain for McCain Prison was employed by the State of North Carolina. Recently, however, we learned that the chaplain resigned. Our penal institutions need our prayers and ministry. Rev. Richard Hopkins and Rev. David Marks are chaplains at local institutions.

Many of our churches participated in the Children's Home Run and gave support and encouragement to the work at Cameron Boys Home.

It is my privilege to preach and teach in our churches. My wife and I taught mission studies for association, state, home and foreign missions this year. We are available to assist our churches with resources that we trust will enhance more effective ministry. Again, we thank you for your love and generosity for making possible the January Bible Cruise to the Bahamas, an experience we shall long treasure! May 1985-86 be our best year as we serve the Lord together!

4. General Board Report

The General Board meets quarterly to perform the business of the Baptist State Convention between annual meetings.

Dr. Roy Smith completes his first year as General Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist State Convention in November 1985. He expressed his gratefulness for the sense of family exhibited by Baptists across the state during his first year in office.

A \$25,120,000 Cooperative Program operating budget was adopted for recommendation to the State Convention annual meeting, November 11-13, 1985 in Charlotte, N.C.

A re-evaluated covenant between Wake Forest University and the Convention was approved pending Convention action. The covenant was originally adopted in 1979 with an agreement that it be re-evaluated every five years. The proposed covenant includes two changes: (1) The University will provide the Convention Nominating Committee pertinent information on qualifications of individuals nominated to serve on their Board of Trustees, (2) The University trustees can elect one-third of its membership from evangelical Christian denominations (non-Baptist), and they need not be residents of the state of North Carolina.

The Cooperative Program receipts will be divided between the Southern Baptist Convention and the N.C. Mission work. The S.B.C. would receive \$8,905,000 (35.45%) and \$16,214,960 (64.55%) would remain in N.C. if our goal is reached. This is a 4.6% increase over the 1985 budget.

The General Board adopted program emphases for 1986-1990 with three major parts: Reach People, Develop Believers, and Strengthen Missions. Goals were set to establish 250 new churches and 500 new work units by 1990, the funding of a \$10,000,000 corpus for church loans, and enrolling 1,000,000 people in Bible Study in N.C. by 1990.

The plan also calls for 400,000 enrolled in discipleship training, 20,000 mission volunteers and 300,000 enrolled in mission education by 1990.

The General Board operates through 10 operational committees: Business Management, Church Programs, Communications, Evangelism, Missions, Stewardship, Youth and Campus, Christian Higher Education, Christian Life, and Social Ministries. The General Board is divided into these committee groups to study and make recommendations on programs for our Baptist State Convention. This gives each member a chance to become involved in the development of programs of their interests and abilities.

6. Music Department

8. Stewardship Department

I was elected by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina to serve on a 10-member Task Force on Planned Growth in Giving. Planned Growth in Giving (PG in G) is a 15-year emphasis that will take us up to the year 2000. It is a plan by which individuals, churches, and state conventions will plan a percentage of growth and giving over the next 15 years.

On Monday, June 3, Robbins First Baptist Church hosted an associational-wide workshop on Planned Growth in Giving. Thirty pastors and stewardship directors enjoyed a delicious meal served by the women of the host church. A video was viewed on PG in G. Those attending were then instructed as to how the local church pastor and director could receive the training to lead their church in this emphasis. Next spring and summer, pastors and stewardship directors will be able to attend a PG in G conference near them. All expenses (except travel) will be provided by our Baptist State Convention.

Following are some of the goals to be reached by Southern Baptists by the year 2000:

1. Annual church contributions increasing from 3.1 billion dollars (1982) to 20 billion
2. Cooperative Program gifts increasing to 2.5 billion annually (total Cooperative Program gifts for the first 58 years of its existence was 2.1 billion)
3. Gifts given through the local association increasing dramatically
4. State Baptist Conventions increasing their percentage of giving to Southern Baptist Convention causes
5. The Southern Baptist Convention increasing its giving to the two mission boards

The emphasis will be upon education and commitment. Begin now to pray for the involvement of your church in PG in G. Elect a key layperson to attend one of the seminars with your pastor. Planned Growth in Giving is the means whereby we, as Southern Baptists, support financially Bold Mission Thrust. May God richly bless you as you faithfully serve Him.

9. Sunday School Department

Several important events took place in the Sandhills Association this year that involved the Sunday School Department.

We were able to recruit a strong enthusiastic ASSISTeam. The team has been trained and made ready to assist the local churches in all areas of Sunday School work. The team received training in conducting Vacation Bible School Clinics at Camp Caraway, Asheboro, North Carolina, on February 28, 1985. They then conducted the VBS Clinic at the Red Branch Baptist Church for the association on April 29, 1985.

The ASSISTeam also traveled to Fayetteville, North Carolina on May 3, 1985 where they attended a workshop in Sunday School leadership. This workshop was designed to equip leaders from the different departments of Sunday School, so they could assist the local churches in equipping workers for their Sunday Schools.

During the Pastor/Sunday School Director Workshop, held at Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, August 5, 1985, the ASSISTeam presented a display of all Sunday School material offered by the Sunday School Board. This was an effort to introduce to the pastors, directors and teachers materials available to help them in teaching the Good News. The team was involved in the associational Sunday School Training, at the Carthage First Baptist Church on September 30, and October 1, 1985. At this training the team taught the series on Bible Teaching through the Sunday School.

Perhaps the highlight of the year came in September when we observed High Attendance Day on the 15th, and Celebration Sunday on the 29th. These events brought to a close the 8.5 for 85 challenge. We would have to say that it was a great success.

Looking ahead we accept the new challenge of 10/90. That means we will enroll 10 million in Sunday School between October 1, 1985 and September 30, 1990. Your associational Sunday School Director, and the ASSISTeam challenge each church to join us along with all Southern Baptists in meeting this goal.

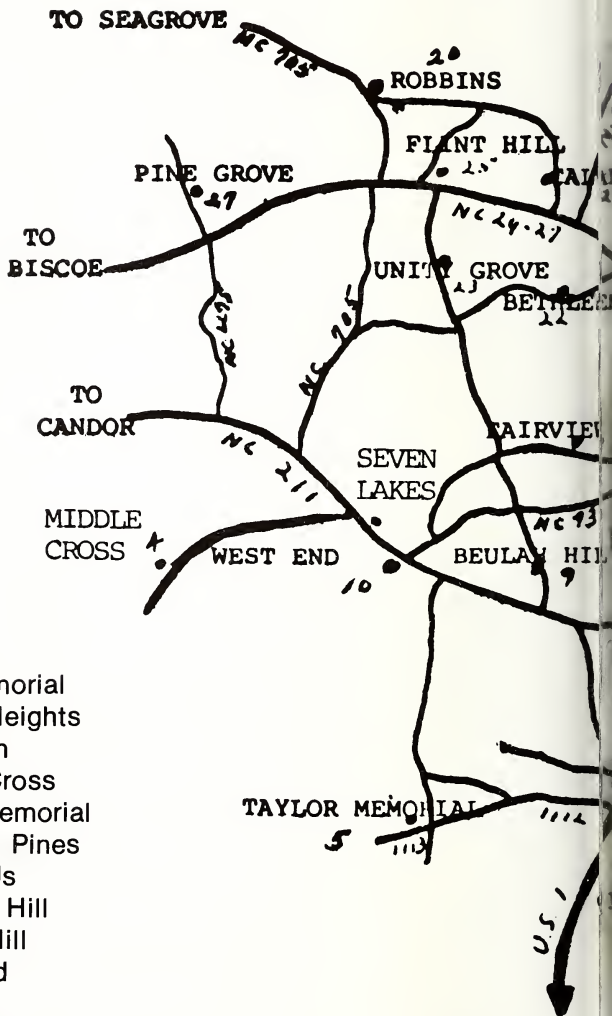

11a. Youth Department

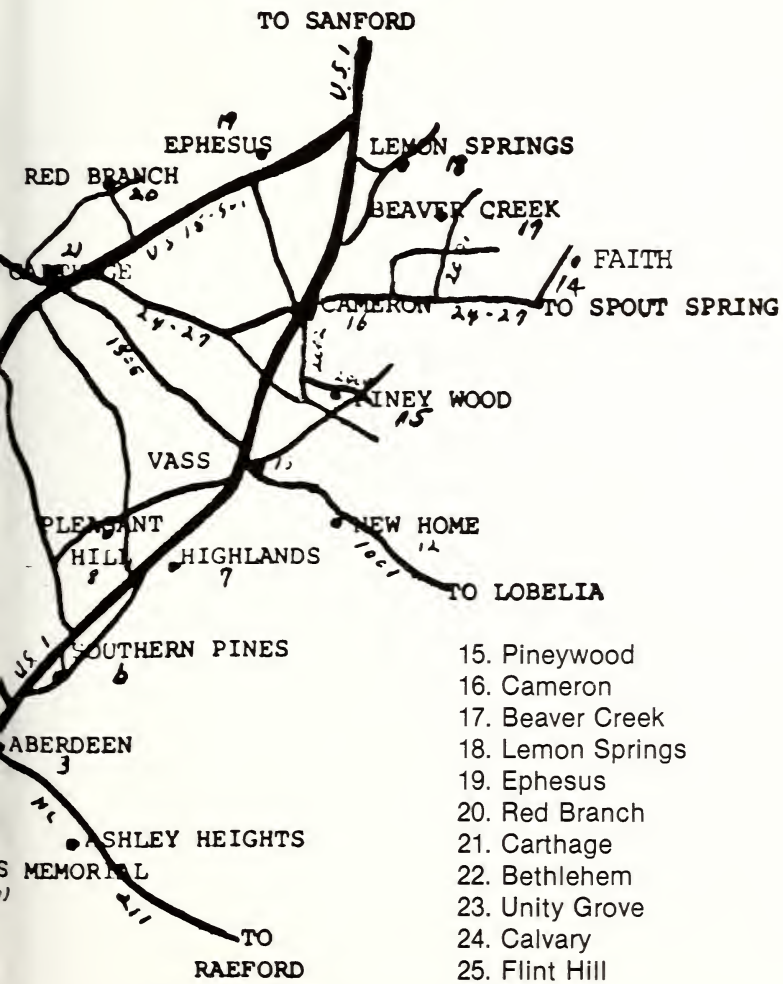

VIII. Institutions, Agencies and Boards

1. Baptist Foundation

A portion of one's resources can be set aside in trusts to further spread the Gospel, in perpetuity. The Baptist Foundation can help make this possible.

In 1984, 81 new trusts were established with the Foundation, totalling \$265,029.34. Additions and contributions to new and existing trusts totalled \$741,153 for the year. Assets of the Foundation at the end of 1984 totalled \$10,930,279. Real estate holdings have an estimated value of \$4.478 million dollars. Income distributed to Baptist institutions and agencies, and to individuals receiving annuity payments totalled \$471,563 during 1984.

2. Baptist Hospital

During the past year 24,577 patients for a total of 218,735 days of patient care were admitted to Baptist Hospital. There were 211,547 outpatient clinic visits and 31,930 visits to the emergency room. Surgical procedures totalled 11,816 including 700 open heart operations and 20 kidney transplants.

The School of Pastoral Care provided clinical-pastoral education to 276 ministers through 47 clinical-pastoral programs. Chaplains in the Department of Pastoral Care made more than 33,000 visits to patients, families of patients and hospital staff. More than 20,000 hours of pastoral counseling at its various centers in Winston-Salem, Fayetteville, Raleigh, Morganton, and Charlotte was provided.

J. Dewey Hobbs began his work on March 15 as the new director of the Department of Pastoral Care.

The hospital received \$351,801 through the North Carolina Missions Offering during the fiscal year. A total of 418 patients received financial assistance on their bills through this fund. The bills ranged in size from \$20 to \$21,000.

The trustees, staff and especially the patients at Baptist are deeply grateful to the Baptist churches for their continuing support.

3. Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc.

North Carolina Baptists have been ministering with older adults through the Baptist Retirement Homes for over 34 years.

From August 1984 to June 1985, an average of 244 residents were cared for in five group homes, Nursing Care Unit and apartments. Over 30 new residents were admitted to the Homes and Nursing Care. Group Home fees for care were not raised. Over \$100,000 of benevolent care was provided monthly to Home residents. Sixty cents of each benevolent care dollar was provided through Cooperative Program and North Carolina Mission Offering gifts. Heart to heart Christmas gifts from friends of the Retirement Homes provided each resident with a \$20 gift. The Nursing Care Unit is operating at 95% plus occupancy. A 20 minute video tape, "Not an Ordinary Person," has been produced to be used in communicating the Retirement Homes' ministry. The Retirement Homes do have vacancies. Make requests for admission through Mr. Jackson S. Hoyle, Administrative Building, Winston-Salem. The fiscal year ending September 30, closed in the black, largely due to special gifts.

5. Baptist Children's Home

The mission of the Home is to care for dependent, neglected and homeless children; emotionally disturbed children; unwed mothers and their children; and the rendering of related services to their relatives. Such services are directed toward the preservation, conservation and rehabilitation of families to avoid, whenever possible, the placement of the child away from home. The Home pledges anew our commitment to continue fulfilling the mission and broad purpose of this Christian institution of caring as we enter our second century of service. In our Centennial year we served 1,517 children and 1,167 families.

Phil Young of Henderson was commissioned to write "Praise Book," a musical about children and their families. Dr. Alan Keith-Lucas wrote "A Hundred Years of Caring," an updated history of the Homes. A new video, "100 Years in Caring," was released in February. Both the book and the video were underwritten by the Broyhill Foundation. During May, June, and July a 1,400 mile relay marathon, the longest in the history of North Carolina, allowed hundreds of people to participate and celebrate the spirit of caring for children. On May 19, 1985 the Governor proclaimed Baptist Children's Home Day. A final event of the Centennial will take place on November 12, 1985 at the Baptist State Convention in Charlotte.

The child care ministry on the Mills Home Campus began November 11, 1885. It was appropriate during this Centennial year to begin a 1,400 mile "Run for the Children" from the Mills Home Campus.

Several beautification goals were accomplished, enhancing the appearance of the Mills Home Campus.

The dedicated staff and alumni are grateful to Baptists for the support given during these 100 years.

IX. Historical Events in the Churches

The Aberdeen Community Christian Renewal Services were

held at Bethesda Presbyterian Church, November 18-21. On the 25th we had our Foreign Mission Study. Our guest speaker was Mrs. Vivian Simpson from Campbell University. December was a very busy month for our church. The Handbell choirs performed in the Aberdeen Christmas parade. A luncheon was held for the Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions. We had a churchwide Christmas dinner and program. On the 16th, White Christmas in Sunday School was observed. Also that day the Adult Choir presented the Christmas Cantata, "A Song for Christmas." The Mission Friends had their Christmas party on the 19th. We held a Community Christmas Eve Service on the 24th. In January we observed Baptist Men's Day. The men's choir sang during morning worship services. January 27th, a baptismal service was held with five candidates for baptism. The church had a special W.M.U. Focus in February. Also a family film series began, "His Stubborn Love," with Joyce Landorf. In March we had a luncheon for the Week of Prayer for Home Missions, with a special program on the theme, "Who Cares?" BETHLEHEM: The 150th Anniversary of Bethlehem Baptist Church was observed October 14, 1984. This was a great day for the church. Rev. Ernest Poston, a former pastor, brought the morning message. We joined Fairview Church for a Community Thanksgiving service. Week of Prayer for Foreign and Home Missions was observed. The Foreign Mission study was taught by Rev. Billy Graham, and the Home Mission study by Mrs. Michael Ray. An Annie Armstrong monologue was presented by Mrs. Pearl Dowd at the morning worship service. A Christmas play, "The First Christmas Morn," was presented December 23. For Focus Week in February, the Baptist Women and G.A.'s met together for a very impressive program and a fellowship picnic. Rev. Marion Parker from Troy, was interim pastor from June 1984 until May 12, 1985. Rev. Jack Gentry, from the Wilmington Association, was called as pastor, and he and his family moved on the church field May 14. Six young people have been baptized by Rev. Gentry since coming to Bethlehem. Offerings for World Hunger and the Pennsylvania Tornado area were taken. On Sunday, June 9, Rev. and Mrs. Gentry had the high school graduates and their parents in their home for breakfast. Graduates were recognized and honored during the morning worship service by the pastor. A gazebo has been erected on the site where the old church burned. CALVARY: We finished our fellowship building and dedicated it Sunday, July 21, 1985. Speaker for the day was Richard Smith, Business Administrator for the State Baptist Convention. Following the service a fellowship dinner was enjoyed. We had four new members baptized, and four others that rededicated their lives and were baptized. There was one death in our church family, Mrs. Dora Benjamin. Johnny and Janice Dowdy gave the church a bus to be used by our youth to the glory of God. CARTHAGE: During the past year the big event at Carthage First Baptist was the calling of a new pastor, the Reverend James Barnwell Gibson, who assumed his pastoral duties on Sunday, July 14, delivering his first sermon on that date. He came to Carthage from First Baptist Church, Timmonsville, S.C., where he was pastor for six years. He has

been in the ministry for a period of 35 years and pastored six churches before coming to Carthage. He is a native of Denmark, South Carolina, attended school there and received his Bachelor of Arts from Furman University in 1949. Rev Gibson attended Southern Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky, and graduated with a Master of Divinity in 1954. He has been active in both associational and denominational affairs, and served on numerous committees and boards including the General Board of the North Carolina State Baptist Convention. He fully supports the Cooperative Program. Mrs. Gibson is from Charlotte. She is a graduate of Meredith College and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. They have two sons, James B. Gibson, Jr. and Franklin R. Gibson. The former lives in South Carolina and Franklin is in the U.S. Air Force stationed in England. Rev. Allen Schuyler, who served as pastor for three and a half years, resigned effective February 10 to accept a call as minister of First Baptist Island Mission at Atlantic Beach. The Reverend Paul Nickens, retired of Southern Pines, was called as interim pastor and served in that capacity until Rev. Gibson arrived here in July. The church honored Rev. Nickens and his wife for his service as interim pastor at a dinner. During the year our membership voted to participate in the national revivals, "Good News America," March 23-27, 1986. Plans are already underway for this special event in the church life next year. (Woodrow Wilhoit, Historian)

EPHESUS: This has been a full and productive year for Ephesus. In the area of membership growth there were 59 additions, 40 of these being by baptism. Our Evangelist Crusade leader, November 25 through December 2, was Thad Hamilton. Dr. Victor Cole, State Baptist Convention Evangelism Director, was our revival speaker, May 19-23. The Adult B Sunday School class hosted a Christmas dinner for our senior adults. Mrs. Gladys Dixon taught the Foreign Mission study. The Home Mission study was taught by Rev. J. Billy Graham. We exceeded both our mission goals. Other speakers we had during the year were: Zeb Moss, Jessie Crooks, former missionaries, and Talmage Williams of the N.C. Baptist Convention Stewardship Department, also Lee Rorie of our own association who represented the Gideons. The choir and other members presented an outstanding Christmas program, entitled, "He Shall Be Called Wonderful," written by the choir director, Judy Allen. Many of our youth and adults enjoyed a ski retreat weekend of February 24th. We joined White Hill Presbyterian Church and Center Methodist Church in pre-Easter services, April 4-5, and the Easter Sunrise service at Center Methodist Church. Our Senior Adult fellowship continues to be active and most of them enjoyed the association Senior Banquet at the Sheraton Inn in May. Our choir sponsored a cookbook that will soon be off the press. A dedication service held for children and parents was on April 7. The W.M.U. sponsored a Prayer Retreat May 4th with our association prayer chairman, Margaret Evans, leading. We also hosted the W.M.U. Workshop on September 24. We employed a youth, Kobi McKenzie, to work during the summer. Three additional Sunday School rooms were added to the educational building and air conditioning units were installed. We observed Men's Day, Women's Day, and Youth Day during the year. The W.M.U. sponsored the donation of birthday gifts in July for the residents of Samrakand Manor, sent a donation to the Thomasville Children's Home, and also gifts for the Home for the Aging. We will be celebrating our 100th Anniversary next year. (Viola Bowlin, Historian)

PLEASANT HILL: This past year has truly been a year of blessings for Pleasant Hill. A special service was held in January to dedicate the newly completed two-story education building. Rev. J. Billy Graham, guest speaker, led in the dedication and a dinner followed in the new fellowship hall. Pictures of historical significance in the life of the church were on display. Two new Sunday School classes were organized and a new piano was purchased. Special emphases on our young people has resulted in regular fellowship outings and the construction of a basketball court and picnic facilities on the church grounds. Rev. Holland held a career seminar for young adults and a prayer seminar. The W.M.U. received an Achievement Recognition Award and the V.B.S. under the leadership of Norma Watkins and C.G. Boyte received an Advanced Achievement Recognition Certificate. Our mission offering goals were exceeded, the Easter Sunrise service and breakfast was well attended, our Senior Citizens were honored in May, and the young people of the church observed Christian Citizenship Sunday in July. Our September fall revival was led by Rev. Clay Davis. We had two deaths this year, Robert Gamble and James Black. We look forward to serving our Lord in the coming church year. (Mrs. Kay D. RED BRANCH: Dr. Victor Cole of the State Baptist Convention was our revival speaker in October. During that week our church sponsored a luncheon at the Palomino Restaurant for the widows in our church. Dr. Cole was our guest and speaker. We had a new church directory made, the second one in four years due to an increase of membership. For a first in our church, and led by Mrs. Don Hays, our ladies made chrismsons, and we had a chrison tree for the Christmas season. On December 2 at 7:30 a dedication service was held with the G.A.'s and Acteens decorating the tree. The Youth Choir sang the carols. Our B.W. and B.Y.W. with the help of the church people sponsor a Clothes Closet and Food Pantry. Twenty-three families were helped last winter. Our pastor taught an eight weeks study course, "Winning Souls to Christ." Evangelist Thad Hamilton was our Crusade speaker in May. Our church ladies got Christmas gifts for the patients in Building I at Convalescent Care of Lee County. These were mostly patients that have no families to care for them. The gifts were carried for their Christmas Eve party, and our church sent bags of fruit for each one. The youth organizations held Thanksgiving and Christmas parties at Reynolds Rest Home. Twenty-one senior citizens attended the Associational Senior Citizens Banquet at Sheraton Inn, Southern Pines, in May. At 6:00 a.m. Easter Sunday morning, a large crowd gathered by the crosses on the hill beyond our cemetery for the Sunrise Service. Later they gathered in the fellowship hall for doughnuts and coffee. The W.M.U. hosted the Annual W.M.U. Association Meeting in March. Under the direction of Mrs. Tommy Lynn Poindexter, choir director, and Paula Yow, pianist, the choir presented the Christmas cantata, "Love Transcending," and an Easter cantata, "Up from the Grave" at their respective seasons. Faith Sunday was August 18 when members were asked to have faith and double their tithes. The offering was \$4,178.85 and Sunday School attendance, 199. We will participate in the simultaneous revivals next spring. The second Sunday in June was dedication day for the parents and children. 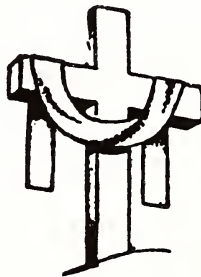
