III. Constitution

of the Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptist.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

- (1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.
- (2) Pastors, of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.
- (3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

- (1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.
- (2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.
- (3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.
- (4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.
- (5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the

Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall brings its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognized that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the Association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be *Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, three (3) Trustees, and Director of Missions.*

Section 2. Departments: This Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees - (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and Bylaws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Director of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) *Biblical Recorder*, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issued before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following Bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or Its Bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
 - (b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.
- (c) Shall be an ex officio members of all standing committees of the Association. Section 2. Vice-Moderator: Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk:

- (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging the Association.
 - (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.
 - Section 4. Treasurer:
 - (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
 - (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall provide a financial statement for publication in the Associational newsletter each month.
- (d) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.
- Section 5. *Historian*: Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the members churches and the Association.
- Section 6. *Parliamentarian*: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. *Trustees*: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

- (a) Search Committee:
- The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.
- (b) Conditions of Employment:
- Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.
- Shall have three (3) weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- May be away from the Association for three (3) weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.

- Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
- 5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five (5) Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
- 6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.
- (c). Duties:
- 1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
- Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.
- Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.
- 5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
- 6. Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
- 7. Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE II! - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

(a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.

- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulte interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the members churches and in Association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.
 - (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

- (a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audio-visual aid materials and equipment.
- (b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

- (a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.
- (c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

- (a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.
- (b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.
 - (c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.
- (d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.
- (e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall Identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
 - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 12. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
 - (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the Association.
- (c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
- (e) The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meetings to the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastors' Conference. The Vice Moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department

Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of this committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning church as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session, or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services or services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The Association may amend or alter the Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

IV. Proceedings

of the Thirty-seventh Annual Session Sandhills Baptist Association

October 20, 1986
MIDDLE CROSS BAPTIST CHURCH

The 37th Annual Session of the Sandhills Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, Bill Bost, October 20, 1986, at the Middle Cross Baptist Church. The pianist was Mrs. Deborah Richardson and Mr. Bruce Hill was the Music Director.

1. Rev. Bob Schwartz gave the devotion on the theme of "servanthood." Mr. Bruce Hill led in singing, "Make Me a Channel of Blessing."

2. The Program Chairman, Rev. Eugene Payne, moved that the printed program and any necessary changes be adopted as the Order of Business. Motion carried.

3. The Moderator recognized messengers and visitors and extended appreciation to the host church for their gracious hospitality in hosting this session.

- 4. The Director of Missions recognized and welcomed Rev. Michael Tillman and family, who came from Concord in June to serve Robbins First Baptist. Two ministers and their families, Rev. Tony Hardin and Rev. Roy Barbee, moved from the Association to other ministries this year.
- 5. Rev. J. Billy Graham gave the Director of Missions Report, expressing appreciation for strong support and for prayer in our mutual, cooperative work.
- 6. Mr. Dewitt Purvis gave the Clerk's Report and Digest of Letters, stating there was progress in almost every area of work among the churches.
- 7. The proposed budget was presented by Finance Committee Chairman, Mr. Curtis Bettini, which was adopted without change. Mr. Bettini announced that he had audited the Treasurer's books and found them in good order, and commended Dr. Wayne Adams for the professional like job he is doing.
- 8. Dr. Wayne Adams gave the Treasurer's Report, with two corrections of figures, which will be altered accordingly in the printed minutes.
- 9. The General Board Report was given by Dr. Fleet Allen, serving his last year in this four-year term. Rev. Max Gilmore will become the Board representative from Sandhills. Mr. Curtis Bettini will continue to serve as Region representative for our Association.
- 10. Rev. Robert Morrison, Jr. gave the Missions Department Report, stating that several persons had been interviewed for the Seven Lakes project and that it has been determined that the Church Planter Apprentice program is not adequate for the Resort Ministries work. Rather, we will consider interviewing an experienced, trained pastor, and offering a larger salary, with help from the Baptist State Convention.
- 11. Rev. Robert Morrison presented the Youth Report in absence of Mr. Jim Perry. Churches are encouraged to send their youth for the Associational Youth Choir rehearsals.
 - 12. There was no Constitution and Bylaws Report.
- 13. Rev. J. Billy Graham recognized Dr. Fleet Allen, expressed appreciation for his many years of devoted service to the Association and State Convention, and presented a beautiful, appropriate plaque. Dr. Allen has served as Moderator, Treasurer, and State General Board member for two terms. There was no further miscellaneous business.
- 14. Mr. Bruce Hill led in singing the hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story," and conducted the Aberdeen First Baptist Church Handbell Choir in presenting two beautiful hymns.
- 15. Rev. Eugene Payne introduced Rev. Dr. Paul Early who brought a challenging message on missions. Dr. Early mentioned the exploding population of our world and challenged us to respond and be God's missionary servants in this world of need.
- 16. Rev. Ken Bouldin, visiting minister, Middle Cross, extended greetings from our host church, invited the messengers and guests to stay for refreshments, and led in the closing prayer and benediction.

October 21, 1986 PINEYWOOD BAPTIST CHURCH AFTERNOON SESSION

- 1. Moderator Bill Bost called the session to order and recognized Mr. Bruce Hill who led in singing the hymn, "We've a Story to Tell." Rev. Michael Tillman gave the devotion. Rev. Charles Lassister, host pastor, extended a hearty welcome.
 - 2. Rev. Eugene Payne gave the Pastoral Ministries Report, now in its second year.
- 3. Rev. James B. Gibson presented the report for Seminary Extension and recognized Rev. David Cannady, Regional Chaplain for area prisons, who spoke briefly on the proposed Pastoral Care Course by seminary extension, to be sponsored by our Association, beginning in February 1986, with Rev. Cannady as teacher.

4. There was nothing to report by the Credentials Committee.

- 5. The Evangelism Report was given by Rev. Gary McNair who mentioned plans for the Central (areawide) Crusade in 1989.
- 6. Mrs. Jessica Hales gave the Senior Adult Report, expressing appreciation for support, and encouraging all churches to elect a Senior Adult Director.

7. The Sunday School Report was given by Rev. Ray Holland, asking for strong sup-

port for the new Sunday School Director, Rev. Don Ballenger.

8. Rev. David Helms gave the Church Training Report, urging attendance to "M" Night, Southern Pines, November 24, and challenging churches to develop strong training programs. "M" Night posters were distributed.

9. Mr. Bruce Hill gave the Music Report, requesting support of Association Youth

Choir, which would be available to sing at special occasions.

10. Rev. J. Billy Graham introduced Rev. Henry Stokes who spoke on Christian Higher Education, with emphasis on the fraternal relationship with Wake Forest, and of the serv-

ice for microfilming church records by Wake Forest Historical Society.

- 11. Dr. Dewey Hobbs had not yet arrived. Rev. Jesse Mansfield led us in a thoughtful, meditative memorial service, as we remembered our deceased loved ones, and thanked God for each of them. Mr. Bruce Hill led in singing "There's a Land That is Fairer Than Day." Dr. Hobbs arrived in time to share with us the ministry of Baptist Hospital, Pastoral Care Department and something of Bowman Gray School of Medicine. Rev. Tom Barnes introduced Dr. Hobbs.

14. Baptist Church Youth Choir, which were well received.

16. During miscellaneous business, Mrs. Barbara Koonce announced that she had written a letter to church WMU Directors asking that each church WMU consider purchasing at least two shirts to send to the Cameron Boys Home, and that some of the shirts were being brought to her.

17. Mr. Paul Daley of the Cameron Boys Home spoke on the ministry of this home, located between Cameron and Vass, and thanked the Association for all the support that they had been receiving. Mr. Daley announced plans for the possibility of building several needed buildings and asked for prayer for a Social Services worker for the camp.

18. Mr. Lane Hall gave the Brotherhood Report, mentioning the work done by our Association in Old Fields, West Virginia, and encouraging attendance to the upcoming Baptist Men's meeting prior to the State Convention in November.

19. Mrs. Barbara Koonce gave the WMU Report.

20. The Committee on Committees Report was adopted as given by Mr. C.G. Boyte.

21. The Nominations Committee as given by Rev. Tom Barnes was adopted.

- 22. Rev. Jack Gentry gave the Stewardship Report, with special emphasis on Planned Growth in Giving and the upcoming Money Management workshop for pastors.
 - 23. The Place and Preacher Report as given by Rev. Lowell Brown was adopted.
 - 24. Mrs. Barbara Koonce presented the Resolutions Report which was adopted.
- 25. Mrs. Carolyn Helms recognized the elected officers, invited them to stand in front, and led in an impressive service of installation. Rev. J. Billy Graham offered the prayer of dedication.

26. Mr. Bruce Hill led in two stanzas of "Rescue the Perishing."

27. Special music was provided by the trio, Mr. and Mrs. Ted Waddell and Mr. Greg Pilson, of Cameron Church, which was enjoyed by all. Then Rev. Jesse Mansfield introduced Rev. Gerald Bridges who delivered a well prepared message on "Called to be Servants." Rev. Bridges spoke of the Holy Spirit and gifts of the Spirit at work in the life of the believer and affirmed that we are all called to be servants, working together in the Body of Christ to honor and glorify Christ our Lord.

28. The 37th session came to adjournment with Rev. John Stone declaring that this session was one of the finest, and leading us in the benediction.

V. Officer's Reports

1. Director of Missions Report

In many ways our Association had a good year in 1985-86. Our major emphasis was the preparation and conducting of the "Good News America, God Loves You" simultaneous revival crusade, a nation-wide project. Some churches, more than others, have visible results with several decisions of faith in Christ. We trust that all churches were strengthened because of the campaign. Evangelism and missions remain the major task for our churches.

Most department directors led in workshops, sometimes with assistance from a consultant from the Baptist State Convention, or another competent person. We are indebted to our dedicated associational leaders, both pastors and laypersons, and thank God for each one.

The theme of this annual meeting calls us to consider our basis for ministry. We are all called to be servants. We serve God and one another. Our cooperative work is based on the principle of servanthood, from the local to the larger world. Here and throughout our Convention we need to pray daily for God's guidance and to be faithful to the principle of mutual trust, love and reconciliation. To do less would hinder the carrying out of the Great Commission and weaken the bond of fellowship. How we need humility and courage in getting on with New Testament missions, which in this generation of Baptists is called "Bold Mission Thrust."

It is my privilege working alongside our pastors. Often the ministers' burden and responsibility weigh heavily upon them and their families. Let us daily pray for these servants of the Lord and support them with encouragement and faithful service. One pastoral seminar was conducted this year. Another is planned in the upcoming year as well as a fellowship/training session for deacons. Two pastoral families moved to other ministries this year: Rev. and Mrs. Tony Hardin, of Robbins, to the Raleigh area, and Rev. and Mrs. Roy Barbee of Middle Cross to the Western part of the state. We welcome Rev. and Mrs. Michael Tillman and family from Concord to the pastorate at Robbins.

Committees have been at work with various mission projects. The Association Office Feasibility Study Committee, Rev. Max Gilmore, Chairman, met several times, and made their recommendation at the September Board meeting. The Nominating Committee, in consultation with the Moderator, is to appoint a Building, Planning, and Funding Committee to lead the Association in this future project. The Association continues to seek to strengthen new work and to develop other new work, such as the Seven Lakes mission project, and to encourage resort-type ministries and Backyard Bible Clubs. 4. General Board Report

The General Board met quarterly in 1986, between annual meetings, to conduct the business of the Baptist State Convention.

The General Board adopted a budget of \$27,637,000 which would be voted on in the annual Convention meeting. The budget would be divided 35 percent (\$9,274,375) to the SBC and 64.5 percent (\$16,850,625) to the State. This is a four percent increase over 1986.

Proposed changes in the new Wake Forest University and State Convention include: (1) The Board of Trustees of Wake Forest University shall be elected by that Board in accordance with such procedures as that Board may prescribe, and (2) Wake Forest shall not share in the distribution of Cooperative Program funds. There will be a recommendation for a change in the Convention Constitution-Bylaws Article XIV to allow for this fraternal relationship.

A proposal is being made for Fruitland Bible Institute to become an agency of the Convention. The institution would operate under a Board of Directors, consisting of 12 members, who shall serve three-year terms. The Chairman of the General Board and the General Secretary-Treasurer shall be ex officio nonvoting members of the Board of Directors. The Constitution change that will provide the arrangement for Fruitland involves Article IV. Instead of "Fruitland Advisory Committee" the word "Agency" shall be added.

The General Board adopted the "People Challenge Mission" for 1986-87 year. It involves taking God's Word to the lost, praying for seven unsaved persons, giving seven Bibles or Scripture portions to unsaved persons, and inviting seven unsaved persons to Outeach Bible Study in Sunday School. The commitment is to: "Go...Tell...Teach." The "I'll take the Challenge" is up to the churches.

The General Board operates through 10 operational committees: Business Management, Church Programs, Communications, Evangelism, Missions, Stewardship, Youth and Campus, Christian Higher Education, Christian Life, and Social Ministries. Each member has a chance to be involved in one of three study groups.

As your representative for the last four years, I served on the Christian Higher Education Council. Rev. Max Gilmore has been elected by the Convention to serve in my place and represent our Association. Mr. Curtis Bettini serves on the Board from our Association as a representative from our Region.

We express appreciation to our Associational Baptist Men and R.A. leadership, particularly, Rev. Tony Hardin, who will be moving to another church. 3. Evangelism Department

The first part of this church year was a busy time in the area of evangelism. This was the time of our "Good News America, God Loves You" (GNA) revivals. This school will be for the purpose of pastors receiving certification in Lay Evangelism School, and will enable them to hold schools in their individual churches.

The possibility of an areawide crusade in the near future has been discussed with the key leaders of our Association. The time being considered for this is 1988 or 1989.

4. Library/Media Department

Mrs. Daphne Leonard has faithfully served as Director of Library/Media Department for the past five years. Daphne is in graduate study and was unable to continue as director for most of this year. We are grateful to her for giving of her knowledge, time, and leader-

ship to this important ministry.

Each church is encouraged to develop a strong library/media work. Good books, resource materials, audio visual equipment, VCR and TV, can help your church conduct a stronger ministry for our Lord. The Association keeps a good supply of video tapes (quarterly update) from the Home and Foreign Mission Boards, filmstrips, the James Dobson Focus on the Family video tapes, equipping center modules, all of which are available to the churches. Each church is encouraged to elect a Library/Media leader and staff your library with persons who will carry on this important ministry. There is an abundance of resource materials from our Baptist State Convention and from the Baptist Sunday School Board.

5. Missions Department

In 1983 the Associational Missions Department started its year with two objectives in mind. One was to encourage each church to form active Mission Committees. This objective has been met in some churches. The other was to start a new work in Seven Lakes near West End. This has not be accomplished.

The fact that these objectives are not complete does not indicate the amount of time and effort that has been expended. Many hurdles needed to be overcome. We have secured individuals from 10 churches to serve on a Steering Committee for Seven Lakes. These are fine dedicated Christians. The minor hurdles have been overcome, there re-

main two hurdles.

Last year we saw only one last step, that was to secure a church planter, or a qualified pastor to accept this mission project in Seven Lakes. The Home Mission Board was to provide \$3,000, the Baptist State Convention, \$3,000, and the Sandhills Baptist Association, \$6,000, a total of \$12,000. This money would be given only to a church planter. We have found no church planter who is qualified for this project. We were forced to turn to more mature qualified men already in the ministry. This in turn created a need for additional funding, at least two times the proposed amount. If a church planter apprentice is not used, the Home Mission Board will not provide the assistance.

We interviewed a very qualified pastor but his needs would be in the category of at least \$28,000 per year. We worked with another pastor, equally qualified, who was interested, but who finally decided to remain in his present pastorate. Presently, we are considering a returned foreign missionary and several pastors. The Mission Department is now convinced that the \$12,000 originally planned will not allow this project to continue. We are presently working on an additional commitment from Baptist State Convention.

Several types of conferences are held during the year for students, including international students, that involve students in Christian growth and stewardship of life.





VIII. Institutions, Agencies and Boards

1. Baptist Foundation

In 1985, the Baptist Foundation placed over one million dollars in new trust agreements with the foundation, making provision for the perpetual support of practically every Baptist cause. Endowment of Cooperative Program was a primary trust designation.

It is now possible through the foundation for each Baptist to "Give it Twice," once to the family, then to Kingdom causes.

The foundation seeks to inform Baptists of:

- 1. Responsibility as stewards to provision for the future use of their resources.
- 2. Critical need for all Baptist causes.
- 3. Ways by which these realities may be met and accomplished.
- 4. Counsel in wise decisions for endowing any Baptist cause.

The local church may benefit in several ways: percent of estate left for the church; Life Estate Agreement; appreciated property and securities; assistance to church in establishing their own endowment, memorials, or Planned Giving Committees; investment in special funds; specific programs in local churches can be left in wills. The role of the foundation is to help the church, the church members and congregations find the best way to make endowments in perpetual support in particular ministries.

2. Baptist Hospital

A total of 23,535 patients with 195,243 patient care days, from across North Carolina and 31 other states and the District of Columbia, represents admittances to Baptist Hospital last year. An additional 252,043 ambulatory patients, and eight patients from

outside the U.S. were given care.

Baptist Hospital has the medical expertise and the technical equipment needed to provide the tertiary health care needed. Among the patients were nine young people who drank potassium hydroxide (lye) thinking it was wine. Lasers are now being used to treat cancer in the early stages and in treating problems of the eye. A new lithotripter uses high energy shock waves to break up large kidney stones. This saves money, and most patients can be discharged the day after treatment, and return to work within a week after therapy.

The hospital now has the use of an emergency helicopter to transport victims of trauma to the hospital more rapidly and to transfer patients from one hospital to another.

The School of Pastoral Care continues its outreach through the satellite centers in Fayetteville, Morganton and Charlotte with opportunities also in other communities such as North Wilkesboro, Lenoir, Asheville and Rockingham. The Raleigh Center has become independent. Together with the center in Winston-Salem, 24,553 hours of counseling was provided. Clinical pastoral education was provided to 694 ministers and trainees through 71 CPE programs. Thank you for the \$556,307 Cooperative Program funds and \$374,238 missions offering.

3. Baptist Retirement Homes

The leadership of the Baptist Retirement Homes is addressing major changes which suggest a need for an adjustment of services. With the increasingly larger senior adult population, consideration is being given to the construction of Continuing Care Communities in Asheville and Charlotte and to the renovation of the campus in Winston-Salem.

Senior adults are living longer and healthier lives. Attention is needed for those adults who will have extended lives.

Improvements and achievements in 1985 include the following: Sound financial management, without increasing residential fees; over \$900,000 of benevolent care was provided to residents; \$785,000 was given through the Cooperative Program, with total budget of \$3.4 million dollars; 40 new residents were admitted to the Homes and Nursing Care construction and renovation of seven new housing units was completed in Willow Cove on the Winston-Salem campus; Bill Stillerman became the new President; Jack Hoyle was appointed Vice-President in Charge of Administration; Carolyn Bunting was appointed Assistant to the President for Admissions; Jim Saul was appointed Assistant to the President for Personnel; Don Piffer was appointed Assistant to the President for Business Affairs; A video tape, "Not an Ordinary Person," produced by the homes in 1985, won the M.E. Dodd Award for Video and Film Productions; residential and apartment living remain available. Make requests to the Assistant to the President for Admissions.

5. Baptist Children's Homes

The Centennial Year for the Baptist Children's Homes of NC was concluded with an exciting, informative and inspiring day on November 11, 1985. The exciting words of Dr. Blackwell, in behalf of our staff, children and trustees, renewed the commitment to continue fulfilling the mission and broad purpose of this child care ministry.

The mission is to care for dependent, neglected, homeless and troubled children; unwed mothers and their children; and the rendering of related services to the relatives. Services are directed toward the preservation, conservation and rehabilitation of families to avoid, wherever possible, the placement of the child away from home.

The new homes and hospital offering, approved by the Convention last November, claimed the attention of our staff during the first five months of 1986.

About 1,500 children were served during the past year. Many of the children had no religious affiliation. Twenty-five youth were baptized by our pastors into the fellowship of the local church. Our children participated in various educational and missions activities in the local churches.

More than 800 alumni returned to Mills Home campus to celebrate homecoming. Thirty-seven percent of the operating budget is derived from Baptists of North Carolina. We are grateful for NC Baptist support.

6. Christian Higher Education

North Carolina is a recognized leader in Christian higher education. Baptists have established and supported seven colleges for a cumulative total of 786 years. The listing of the seven colleges and universities are below: Campbell will celebrate its 100th year in 1986. It has programs in several cities and two foreign countries (Wales and Malaysia). Chowan is a two-year college of high quality. The college is engaged in a 4,000,000 dollar campaign for additional student aid, scholarship assistance and program support. Gardner-Webb welcomed Dr. M. Christopher White on June 1 as new President. Deaf and

blind students may earn degrees at the college. Mars Hill is developing statements of convictions by the faculty which include statements on the Christian faith, morals and purposeful life, responsible citizenship and the value of work. Meredith has as its central mission "through instruction" and "culture made perfect through the religion of Jesus Christ." The new Gaddy-Hamrick Art Center was begun in June. Wake Forest, founded in 1834 by NC Baptists, continues conversations with Convention leaders regarding the continuing relationship between the university and the convention. The university is regarded as a superior school among church-related institutions in the nation. Wingate looks forward to its 100th anniversary in 1995, with a 10-year, 30 million dollar "Second Century: Vision for Excellence" campaign.

IV. Historial Events in the Churches

The WMU celebrated their centennial birthday in January along with the Good News America Evangelistic Rally on January 19. The weekly family night suppers began in February. There was an Upper Room Communion Service on March 27, and a special Easter Service on the 30th. Good News America Revival Services with Dr. William Leathers were held April 6-10, 1986. We began the film series by Charles Swindoll in April. The Senior Adult musical, "More Than Ever Before" was presented May 4 during morning worship; during evening worship the College Park Baptist Church Young Adult Ensemble presented "I Promise to Love." Baby dedication was held on Mother's Day. The Youth Choir program, "There's a Reason" was given on June 1. In July, 15 persons went on a youth mission trip to Lee, New Hampshire. Special events in August were Christmas in August Dinner and Staff Appreciation Program; Pastor and trio from Old Fields Baptist Church in West Virginia brought special music and message. Homecoming was observed on September 28, 1986. (Alease Fowler)

BEAVER CREEK: This year our church building note was paid off. In November, Rev. Randy Kilby of Gardner-Webb was our Youth Revival speaker. Our church Christmas play was presented at McCain prison. Ben Bryant, from Starke, Florida, was guest speaker for spring revival. Church-wide fellowship and trips included a family picnic at New Life Camp, VBS picnic at Morrow Mountain, and a trip to Fantasy Lake. The RA's attended the Associational Track and Field Day and won some ribbons. One hundred new padded chairs, and a desk for adult teachers, a literature rack, a book truck for the library, and filing cabinet were purchased; also five folding tables, as memorials were given to the fellowship hall. On September 12 a Sunday School Appreciation banquet was given for all teachers and officers. Johnny Ross was guest speaker. "Agapaopob's," a kid's musical all about love, was presented by the children and youth on September 14. (Geneva Gordon)

CALVARY: Calvary Baptist Church has had many improvements in the last year. First of all we did a new directory for the church. We remodeled the kitchen in our fellowship hall and remodeled a room in our church for a new nursery. We also paved our parking

CAMERON: The 1980s have challenged many traditional strongholds in our nation and churches all across our land. The members of Cameron Baptist Church were asked to change the wording of the constitution to allow women to become deacons. As any such controversial issue, much discussion and prayer took place leading to a negative response of such a change at this time. Our music director, Sandra Hancock McNeill. resigned during the present church year after several faithful years of service to ourmusic program. Our interim music director, James Gregory Pilson, has filled in most admirably. We joined in with many other sister churches to mark the 100th anniversary of WMU and took part in the "Good News America" Revival, March 23-30, with Rev. Robert Denton as speaker. A van fund was begun by our church to help further our church's witness in our community. On Wednesday, July 23, 1986, Cameron Baptist (formerly Crain's Creek Missionary Baptist Church) celebrated its 132nd anniversary. Since Sunday, July 20, 1985, was the closest Sunday, our church historian read the original preamble and covenant drafted and adopted 132 years earlier by our eight charter members. The history of Crain's Creek Missionary Baptist Church is contained in the book entitled, Gone and Almost Forgotten: Crain's Creek Community, dedicated in memory of those faithful founding members by the author, James Vann Comer. On August 5, 1986, Cameron Baptist Church purchased three lots (containing app. one acre) across McKeithen Street for our future fellowship hall to be built upon. The buildings situated upon said land were to be moved by sealed bids to ensure fairness. A suggestion box was added for members to voice their ideas and opinions and the contents were to be discussed by the deacons at each deacon's meeting. (James Vann Comer)

CARTHAGE: One of the main highlights of the 1985-86 church year in Carthage First Baptist Church was the establishment in May of a fellowship hall building fund. On homecoming day, which was held the third Sunday in May, a significant amount of money was given to this special fund, and a number of pledges were made to be paid over a period of six months. Through the month of August an amount of more than \$11,000 had been received for the Fellowship Fund. The homecoming had one of the largest attendances in several years with many former members returning for the occasion, along with two former pastors, Dr. Ray Benfield and the Reverend Walter Warfford. Another highlight during the year was employing a youth director for 10 weeks during the summer. He was Tom Cabaniss, a student at Mars Hill College, who did a very fine job in that capacity. This year for the first time the church purchased a bus and in May a group

used the bus to go to Caswell for a weekend retreat. (Woodrow Wilhoit)

EPHESUS: Church members are excited about our history this year. We will be celebrating our Centennial on September 28, 1986. Our history tells us that Ephesus has always been a mission-minded church, and we are continuing in our forefathers' foot-

steps.

This year our church is just full of first time events. We are not only celebrating the Centennial of our church, but also 100 years of WMU. We also had a "first" baptismal service on Wednesday night, because the candidate was going into the Navy before another Sunday service could be held. Our choir published the first cookbook from our church, and the Centennial Committee published our first 100 years in a history book. One of our most meaningful firsts, is the commissioning service held on August 10, 1986, for our own Don and Janet Pittman. They will be leaving soon for the foreign mission field of Ethiopia.

Our mission programs have continued to be strong this year. Our church held a week of prayer for Foreign and Home Missions. Mr. and Mrs. J. Billy Graham taught our Foreign and Home Mission study this year.

Our Mission Friends have been very active. They have had many mission projects such as making cards for shut-ins, visiting and singing to shut-ins, sponsoring the childrens Easter egg hunt, and the "Christmas in August" project.

The GA's have also been busy with several projects such as making Christmas balls for the residents at the nursing home, Christmas caroling in the community, and visiting

nursing homes several times.

The Acteens have been faithful in making posters for the many church-wide mission projects. They have visited the shut-ins and the nursing homes several times, raised money for the "Lottie Moon Christmas Offering" by acting as a post office, delivering Christmas cards from members of our church and giving the money for postage to the Lottie Moon offering.

The Crusaders hosted the Pinewood Derby Race at Ephesus. Our own Lee Kelly won second place in the third and fourth grade division, and B.J. Kelly won second place in

the fifth and sixth grade division.

The Pioneers have raised money for the Lottie Moon project by doing yard work. They

went to see Jerry Clower this year in Charlotte.

The Baptist Men have helped several senior adults in the community with needed home improvements. They also hosted a breakfast for the joint Sunrise service we had with Center Methodist and White Hill Presbyterian churches.

The Baptist Women and Young Baptist Women have had many mission projects such as helping families at Christmas, sending gifts to the prisons, giving food to needy families and so on. Our church hosted, and the women cooked food for the annual Asso-

ciational meeting.

Our own Jim Perry was elected as Associational Youth Director at the Association. He has led the youth of the Association with the help of J. Billy Graham in a people search at Faith Baptist Church. The Associational youth also had a volleyball-ice cream party, a lock-in, and cookout. An Associational Youth Choir has been started with the leadership of Bruce Hill.

The Youth Fellowship Bible Study groups have grown this year. A new group has been added, which is two year olds through second grade. They are very active and enthusiastic! They went Christmas caroling, to San Lee Park for a Halloween Contest, and had a cookout at a local park.

Our third through sixth grade Youth Fellowship presented a Christmas program, a puppet skit to promote VBS, went Christmas caroling and spent a day at Waterville, USA.

The seventh through twelfth grade Youth Fellowship have had lock-ins, cookouts, and went to the State Fair. They also went on a ski trip to Boone, NC in January, and a Beach Youth Retreat in June. They raised their own money for their trips by having car washes, bake sales and yard sales.

The Senior Adults have a program each month and presented special music during "Senior Adult Recognition" in our church. They also participated in the Associational

Senior Adult Dinner in Southern Pines, NC.

Our VBS was held June 15-20 with a program and hot dog supper on the last night. It was a great success. There was something for everyone, with a class for two year olds through senior adults. There were many skinned knees but happy faces at the closing of our Bible school. The seventh through twelfth grade class was the largest class, with the adult class running a close second. Two of our members taught at the VBS Clinic this year. Pauline Morrison taught the youth, and Lynn Perry taught the third and fourth grade class.

Our revival was held March 9-13 with Rev. Charles High of Dallas, NC. There were several cottage prayer meetings held before our revival began. Several accepted Christ as Saviour, and many rededicated their lives to Christ.

Our pastor, Rev. Bob Morrison, was invited to be the speaker at three revivals this year. He spoke at Robbins First Baptist Church in October, Red Branch in November, and Pine

Grove in August.

The choir has been very successful with the cookbook they published. The first order of 276 books was sold within three days! The second order has been sold out, with more orders still coming in for cookbooks. The money from the cookbooks is being used for music, and for a large donation on our fellowship hall. We have also been busy singing. We sang at Red Branch during their revival, and have hosted several song services at our church. We also hosted a church-wide appreciation party for Judy Allen who led our choir for nine years. Joe Calendine became our new choir director on February 19, 1986.

Each month we have a special song service. Not only have our choir and church members provided the music, but we have also had special groups come in and sing for us. They include: The Hickory Mountain Singers, The Young Believers from Greensboro, Trinity, and the Marksmen Quartet.

Baptists wouldn't be considered "true Baptists" without dinners, and of course we have had several. Some of our special dinners have been to honor such people as our pastor on his birthday, our pastor and his wife on their anniversary, our WMU 100-year celebration, Don and Janet Pittman's farewell dinner, and the Cooke family honored their mother, Jenny Cooke, with a surprise birthday dinner.

We have had several guest speakers including Rev. Paul Nickens, Rev. Marion Parker, Rev. J. Billy Graham, and Mr. Russell Davis, a Gideon. We also had a foreign missionary home on furlough to speak, Mrs. Betty Scarbrough from Belize, Central America.

God has allowed us to participate in several meaningful services this year. Some that stand out in our minds are the Annual Joint Thanksgiving and Easter Sunrise Services with Center Methodist Church and White Hill Presbyterian Church. Our Mother's Day and Father's Day services were very special, and also our Christmas program called "The Candle in the Window" about a broken home. Also in conjunction with our celebration, we will be placing a plaque naming our fellowship and educational building the "Verla Fisher Hix Building" after one of our most faithful senior adult members, who went home to be with our Lord in July of this year. 



IV. Constitution

of the

Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptist.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

- (1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.
- (2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.
- (3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

- (1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.
- (2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.
- (3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.
- (4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognized that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the Association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be the *Moderator*, *Vice-Moderator*, *Clerk*, *Treasurer*, *Historian*, *Parliamentarian*, *three* (3) *Trustees*, and *Director of Missions*.

Section 2. Departments: This Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occuring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees - (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and Bylaws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Director of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issued before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following Bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its Bylaws.

ARTILCE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
 - (b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.
 - (c) Shall be an ex officio members of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. *Vice-Moderator:* Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk:

- (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
 - (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. Treasurer:

- (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
- (b) Shall keep an accurage record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.
- Section 5. *Historian:* Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.
- Section 6. *Parliamentarian:* Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. *Trustees:* Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

(a) Search Committee:

1. The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

(b) Conditions of Employment:

- 1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.
- 2. Shall have three (3) weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- 3. May be away from the Association for three (3) weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meeting will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- 4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
- 5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five (5) Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
- 6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c) Duties:

- 1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- 2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
- 3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.
- 4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.
- 5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
- 6. Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
- 7. Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program(Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulated interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.
 - (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audiovisual aid materials and equipment.

- (b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

- (a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.
- (c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

- (a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.
- (b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.
 - (c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.
- (d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.
- (e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
 - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 12. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
 - (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the Association.
- (c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
 - (e) The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such actions as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meetings to the Association for final disposition. It shall make full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parlimentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastors' Conference. The Vice Moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them to for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No member, exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of the committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other micellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the

Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning churches as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations at it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services or services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting and the preacher and alternate of the annual session.

meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The Association may amend or alter the Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

of the

Thirty-eighth Annual Session Sandhills Baptist Association

October 19, 1987 FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, WEST END

Moderator Bill Bost called the 37th Annual Session of the Sandhills Baptist Association to order on October 19, 1987, 7:00 p.m. at First Baptist Church, West End.

- 1. Mrs. Elda Thorpe of Pleasant Hill church gave an inspiring devotion from Deut. 6:1-9 and Hebrews 12.
 - 2. Rev. Bryson Bigby extended a cordial welcome on behalf of West End church.
- 3. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in the singing of the hymn, "Rescue the Perishing," with Mrs. Mary Greene at the piano and Mrs. Sherlyn Harris at the organ.
- 4. Rev. Edwin Carrol moved that the printed program and any necessary changes be adopted as the order of business. Motion carried.
 - 5. The moderator recognized messengers and then visitors by having them stand.
- 6. The Director of Missions made the following introductions of new church staff persons: Mrs. Joyce Davis, Robbins, First; Mrs. Ruth Sinclair, Southern Pines First; Ms. Debbie Keaton, a recent graduate of Southern Seminary, introduced by Pastor Charles Hinson for Aberdeen First; and Rev. Eugene Payne announced that Mr. Greg Burris was now on the staff at Cameron. All the new staff persons serve in the ministry of music.
- 7. The Director of Missions, Rev. J. Billy Graham, gave his report and mentioned that three churches were searching for pastors: Middle Cross, Beulah Hill and West End.
- 8. The Clerk, Mr. Dewitt Pruvis, presented the Digest of Letters Report and also gave some statistical information on the State and Southern Baptist Convention.
 - 9. The Treasurer's report was adopted as presented by Dr. Wayne Adams.
- 10. The proposed 1987-88 Budget was adopted as presented by the Finance and Budget Chairman, Mr. Curt Bettini, who also stated that the Treasurer's records had been audited and were found to be in good order.
- 11. Rev. Max Gilmore gave the General Board Report, expressing appreciation for the privilege of serving in that capacity. Rev. Gilmore serves on the committee for Social Services Institutions and Mr. Curt Bettini serves in Region 4 on the Business Management Committee.
- 12. Rev. Robert Morrison gave the Missions Department Report, requesting that no further contributions be given to Seven Lakes mission project until the Association, working with the State Convention makes a Probe. Expression of appreciation was given for Kobi McKenzie serving as our Migrant missionary this summer.
 - 13. Since Mr. Jim Perry was not present, there was no Youth Report.
- 14. Mr. Dewitt Purvis, Co-chairman of the Associational Building Committee, in the absence of Rev. Ray Holland, chairman, presented the report for this committee. Mr. Purvis reported on the developments of formation and progress of the

Associational Office Building Committee and read three recommendations dealing with purchase of property, establishment of a building fund, and the appointment of six additional members to serve with the committee. A motion was made and approved that the Association consider the three recommendations and the report for adoption at the miscellaneous time at 7:15 p.m. at the Tuesday session.

15. The Moderator gave a touching, personal tribute to his beloved pastor, Rev. Max Gilmore, who retired as pastor of Beulah Baptist Church, and recognized Rev. Gilmore who sang, "The King is Coming," accompanied by Mrs. Mary Greene.

- 16. Rev. Billy Graham expressed appreciation to the Program Committee for an excellent program and introduced Dr. Russell Willis, Director of Missions for the Cabarras Baptist Association, who brought a challenging message from Acts 3 on the subject of "Volunteer Missions."
- 17. The Moderator reminded messengers and visitors of the invitation of the host church to go to the Fellowship Hall for refreshments and fellowship and called on Dr. Bill Walton to lead in the benediction. The session was adjourned until Tuesday, October 20, 4:00 p.m. at Vass First Baptist Church.

October 20, 1987 FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, VASS AFTERNOON SESSION

- 18. Moderator Bill Bost called the afternoon session to order and recognized Rev. Mike Ray who brought an inspiring devotional, including singing the chorus he learned in India, "Jesu Yoku Pramma" ("Jesus is Love"). Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the hymn, "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations." Host Pastor Jesse Mansfield extended a cordial welcome and gave instructions regarding church facilities and the meal that was to follow.
- 19. Rev. Eugene Payne gave the Pastoral Ministries Report, stressing that ministries were for pastors and laypersons. A Deacons workshop will be held at Southern Pines on November 23 with Rev. Harold McDonald as leader.
- 20. Rev. James B. Gibson presented the Seminary Extension Report and awarded certificates to Rev. Eldon Hinegardner, Rev. Ray Holland, Rev. Eugene Payne, Rev. Edwin Carroll, Mrs. Pauline Morrison and Mrs. Viola Bouldin for completing the 10 week Pastoral Clinical Course taught by Rev. Daivd Canady. The Moderator recognized Rev. David Canady, area prison chaplain, who expressed appreciation to the Association and to classmembers. Rev. Billy Graham awarded ChaplainCanady a Certificate of Award for his teaching the class.
- 21. Mrs. Jessica Hales gave the Senior Adult Report, stressing the need for each church to elect a Senior Adult Director and to organize a Senior Adult group. The Associational Senior Adult ministry is enlarging each year.
- 22. Rev. Don Ballenger gave the Sunday School Report, stating that the Sunday School Team (ASSIT) is available to help churches with Sunday School needs.
- 23. Mrs. Sylvia Purvis gave the Library/Media Report, mentioning that any church without a church library could receive free materials from the Sunday School Board.
- 24. Rev. Curtis Barbery, pastor at Beulah Baptist Church, gave a brief report on Fruitland Bible Institute, stating that the school is supported by the Cooperative Program and is now under the General Board, and not the convention Missions Department. Miss Nancy Curtis, Ex. Director, WMU, Baptist State Convention, told of the 100th anniversary celebration of the WMU and emphasized the work of the Woman's Missionary Union and of cooperative work of all church members in support of world

missions. Rev. Jim Lambert, Director, Minister Support and Pastor/Church Relations, spoke on the need to support church ministers with annuity and retirement. Rev. Lambert is available to churches in pastor/church relations and in the work of the pastor/church search committee. An Emergency Assistance Fund is available to pastors who are relieved from churches.

25. A meaningful Memorial Service was conducted by Rev. Robert Wilson who spoke from I Thessalonians, giving loving tribute to our loved ones who had gone to be with the Lord, and encouraged us who remain to be faithful in service in the Lord. Mr. Ed

Baggett led in singing the hymn, "Great is Thy Faithfulness."

26. During the miscellaneous business period, Mr. and Mrs. Buford McKenzie shared some developments at Cameron Boys Home: Sandy Creek Association is helping to renovate the Chuckwagon, with some assistance from individuals and churches in other associations; the therapeutic camping ministry ranks among the best in the nation; a new Social Worker was introduced to the Association. Appreciation was expressed for prayer and support of the local home and for all the ministries of the Baptist Children's Homes.

27. Rev. Tom Barnes read a scripture selection from Acts 2:41-47 and led in prayer. Since Rev. Ray Holland is in Korea on a preaching mission, the Campbell Singers gave a musical concert which took the place of the annual sermon.

28. Rev. Jesse Mansfield cordially invited messengers and visitors to stay for dinner and offered the prayer of thanksgiving for the meal. A delicious meal was enjoyed in the fellowship hall and small chapel of the host church.

EVENING SESSION

- 29. Reading from Acts 7, Rev. Robert Denton brought a challenging devotion on the importance of missions. Mr. Ed Baggett led in the singing of the hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story."
- 30. During the Miscellaneous Business period, Moderator Bill Bost recognized Mr. Dewitt Purvis who reviewed information on the Associational Office Building report given on Monday evening and described how the Location Sub-committee had examined several possible location sites for locating the Associational Office. Feasibility Study made in 1985-86 recommended that the location of the office building be on a site that is visible, accessible and geographically central to all the churches. The association sub-committee, composed of Mr. Dewitt Purvis, Mr. Clyde Burge and Rev. Max Gilmore, selected the site on Highway 15-501, south of Carthage, containing 3.2 acres, adjacent to Phillips Motor Company and opposite the Moore County School Administration Building. It is easily accessible from highways 15, 501, 24, 27, 22, the Siler City Highway, and is not far from the Moore Memorial Hospital. It is centrally located to our churches in Lee, Harnet, North Moore, South Moore and Hoke counties. The lot has already been graded for construction by the present owner and has a paved road to the side nearest Phillips Motor. A member of the committee, Mr. Clyde Burge, arranged a six month option by paying \$100.00 with terms for purchase - \$36,000.00, with 10 percent down, the balance to be financed by owner at 9 percent for ten years, if necessary, for full payment. The three recommendations from the committee to the Association are as follows:
 - Authorize the purchase of the Clinton Campbell property on 15-501. Arrangements are to be made in consultation with the Finance and Budget Committee and the Associational Trustees.

- 2. Establish an Office Building Fund.
- 3. Appoint six additional members to serve on the Associational Office Building Committee. These six persons would compose a Special Gifts Sub-committee which would develop plans for fund-raising and memorial gifts. The six members will be appointed by the Moderator, in consultation with the Associational Office Building Committee Chairman and the Nominating Committee Chairman.

Following discussion to purchase the 3.2 acre lot, a motion was made and seconded to accept the three recommendations. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

- 31. Mr. Lane Hall gave the Brotherhood report, encouraging Baptist men to attend the Brotherhood Convention in Greensboro in November.
- 32. Mrs. Barbara Koonce gave the WMU report. A beautiful picture had been prepared in celebration of the 100th anniversary celebration of Woman's Missionary Union. Mrs. Koonce presented the picture to Rev. J. Billy Graham and to Mr. Bill Bost, for placement in the Associational Office.
- 33. Dr. William Walton gave the Committee on Committees report which was adopted as given.
- 34. In the absence of Mr. Glen Crissman, Rev. Tom Barnes gave the Nominating Committee report which was adopted as presented.
- 35. With emphasis on Planned Growth in Giving, Rev. Jack Gentry gave the Stewardship Department report.
- 36. Rev. Mike Tillman gave the Place and Preacher report which was adopted. Rev. Richard Hodges will be the preacher for 1988 annual session. Host churches for the 1989 annual session will be Taylor Memorial and Southern Pines First.
 - 37. The Resolution Committee report given by Mrs. Carol Blake was adopted.
- 38. The Director of Missions presented certificates of Awards to Miss Kobi McKensie, Summer Migrant Missionary, and to Moderator Bill Bost for excellent service to the Association as Vice-Moderator and as Moderator. A plaque with gavel also will be given to Mr. Bost. Rev. Graham expressed appreciation to the Association for strong support of the Associational Office Building Committee in the vote to purchase the land to construct an Associational Office Building, saying it was "an historic moment in the life of the Association" and a "time to celebrate."
- 39. Mrs. Dorothy Caroll led in a meaningful installation service for 1987-88 Associational Officers. Each officer was given a small candle which was lit by the Moderator and extended to each officer. Officers were encouraged to "Shine as lights in the world," as Jesus did. Rev. J. Billy Graham led in the prayer of dedication.
- 40. Mr. Ed Baggett led in singing the hymn, "He Keeps Me Singing." The moderator called for a motion to adopt all reports that had been received during the annual session. The motion was approved.
- 41. Three athems were beautifully sung by the Vass First Baptist Choir, directed by Mrs. Cynthia Spivey and accompanied by Mrs. Judy Mansfield.
- 42. Moderator Bill Bost expressed appreciation to all messengers and to everyone responsible for assisting with the annual session, recognized the new moderator, Rev. John Stone, presented the moderator's gavel and pledged support for Rev. Stone and Dr. Bill Walton, Vice-Moderator.
- 43. Rev. J. Billy Graham introduced Dr. Douglas Cole, Executive Director, Christian Life Council, Baptist State Convention, who brought an informative message on "Our Baptist Heritage." Dr. Cole stated that Baptists should treasure and protect Baptist distinctives and the freedom initiated and fostered by our Baptist ancestors. Dr. Cole

suggested that in the future there would be an increasingly greater ministry to senior adults and a lesser minister to younger persons, based on the following population predictions, by age groups: ages 10-15, 5 percent; ages 15-19, 9 percent; ages 20-24, 10 percent; ages 45-64, 20 percent; ages 65-74, 19 percent; and ages 75 and up, 44 percent.

44. Following a motion for adjournment, the new moderator, Rev. John Stone, commended the association for the wonderful harmony and fellowship that existed, despite controversy in the Convention, and led in the benediction.

3. General Board Report

A signal honor was bestowed upon me in November 1986 when I was elected to represent the Sandhills Baptist Association on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention. Even though I have been involved in Baptist life and activities at various levels for over forty years, I was amazed to learn of the magnitude and complexities of the mission and ministries of the Baptist State Convention.

The General Board meets quarterly to perform the business on the Baptist State Convention between annual meetings. This year the meetings were held at Camp Caraway in February, at Gardner-Webb in May, and again at Camp Caraway in September.

The General Board is composed of 10 operational committees: Business Management, Church Programs, Communications, Evangelism, Missions, Stewardship, Youth and Campus, Christian Higher Education, and Social Ministries. I requested to be and was assigned to the Council on Christian Social Services which is concerned with providing a well-integrated program at the Baptist Children's Homes, the Baptist Retirement Homes, and the Baptist Hospital.

Reports indicate that 1987 has been a good year for the Baptist State Convention. Some outstanding matters which were approved and will be presented at the Annual Meeting of the Baptist State Convention in November for adoption were:

- 1. A proposed Cooperative Budget of \$27,637,000 and a Challenge Budget of \$28,000,000.
- 2. A National Missions Prayer plan.
- 3. That Christian Education funds be equally divided among the 6 Baptist colleges for the next 5 years.
- 4. A partnership between the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the state of Sao Paulo, Brazil Baptist Convention with a goal to organize 1,000 new Baptist churches during 1987-1992.
- 5. That the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina be authorized to borrow up to \$1,688 million to secure land in the Charlotte, N.C. area for the location of a retirement development similar to the one presently being constructed in Winston-Salem, N.C.
- 6. Approved a constitution for Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute.
- 7. Announced the location for the Annual Meeting of the Baptist State Convenion in 1988 at Fayetteville, N.C.

I appreciate the opportunity to serve in this capacity on your behalf.

Our areawide crusade has again been put on hold because of our upcoming World Missions Conference and simultaneous revivals.



4. Library Media Report



VIII. Committee Reports

1. Associational Office Building Committee Report

On October 21-22, 1985, the association authorized Moderator Eugene Payne to appoint the following Feasibility Study Committee: Rev. Max Gilmore, Mrs. Gloria Holland and Mr. Jim Blowe. The purpose of the committee was to study the possibility of relocating and constructing a new associational office building and to make a report of its findings to the Associational Board, 1986.

On October 20-21, 1986, in annual session, the association adopted the Associational Feasibility Study Committee's report and the following recommendation:

"That the Moderator of the association, in consultation with the Associational Nominating Committee, recommend a long-range planning, funding, building committee composed of nine (9) members representing all geographical areas of the

association." Moderator Bill Bost appointed the following persons: Rev. Ray Holland, Chairman, Mr. Dewitt Purvis, Co-Chairman, Mr. Clyde Burge, Mr. Ted Godwin, Mr. Clayton Holder, Rev. Max Gilmore, Mrs. Carolyn Helms, Mr. Joe Blowe and Mrs. Barbara Whitaker.

On June 25, 1987, the committee met and organized into three sub-committees: (1) Location, (2) Finance, and (3) Plans.

On September 3, 1987, the committee met to share reports of work done during the summer. Operating within the guidelines recommended by the earlier Feasibility Study Committee, the committee discussed several possible location sites. The Director of Missions received approval from Drew University to write his dissertation paper on the project under the title: The Process of Locating and Planning the Funding and Constructing of a Baptist Associational Resource Center."

On September 14, 1987, the committee reported to the Executive Committee and the Associational Board. Mr. Clyde Burge, acting for the committee, arranged to place a deposit of \$100.00 to secure an option for six months on the 3.2 acre lot owned by Mr. Clinton Campbell. The lot is located on 15-501, adjacent to Phillips Motor Company, and is visible, accessible and almost in the center of the association. The terms for purchase would be: \$36,000. with 10 percent down, with payment to be up to 10 years, if necessary, at 9 percent.

On September 28, 1987, Mr. Edwin Coats, Director of the Baptist Foundation, Baptist State Convention, told the committee how special gifts could be obtained, and offered his service to the association.

The Office Building Committee will meet three times in November 1988, for study and to draw up recommendations for the association to consider at the January 18, 1988 Associational Board meeting. The committee offers the following recommendations to the association for consideration at the October 19-20 annual session:

- 1. Authorize the purchase of the Clinton Campbell property on 15-501. Arrangements are to be made in consultation with the Finance and Budget Committee and the Associational Trustees.
- 2. Establish an Office Building Fund.
- 3. Appoint six additional members to serve on the Associational Office Building Committee. These six persons would compose a Special Gifts sub-committee which would develop plans for fund-raising and memorial gifts.

7. Seminary Extension Report

Southern Baptist Seminaries have been offering off-campus theological training through the Seminary Extension for thirty-six years. During 1986-87, our center in Sandhills Baptist Association was part of the network of more than 400 similar extension centers throughout the country. This was the first year in several that a center has been operated in the Association.

Our center offered one course during the year. The course, Clinical Pastoral Training, taught by David Cannady from North Carolina Department of Corrections, lasted for a total of ten weeks. Twelve people were enrolled. Classes met each morning between nine and twelve o'clock at First Baptist Church in Carthage.

While seminary extension courses are designed primarily for pastors and other ministers who have missed out on seminary training, many lay church leaders also have used the courses to strengthen their own ministries. Some seventy ministry-related courses are now available from the Seminary Extension Department. In addition to being offered through centers such as the one in Sandhills Baptist Association, most of these courses also are available for correspondence study.

1. Baptist Foundation Report

It is possible now, through the Baptist Foundation, for each Baptist to "Give it Twice", once to the family, then to kingdom causes.

The Foundation seeks to inform Baptist of:

- 1. Responsibility as stewards in providing for the use of their resources.
- 2. Critical need for all Baptist causes.
- 3. Ways by which these realities may be met and accomplished.
- 4. Counsel in wise decisions for endowing any Baptist cause.

Assets of the Foundation have increased to more than \$13,000,000. These dollars are expressions of concern made by Baptist stewards. It makes possible in a greater way a ministry and witness to the lost and to the needy of our world. This past year the Foundation helped make possible a credit line of \$3,000,000 for church loans.

2. Baptist Hospital Report

During the past year, Baptist Hospital admitted 22,973 patients. More than 1,000 of those patients had heart surgery and 27 received kidney transplants. During this period, the hospital also performed its first heart transplant and, as of June 1, 1987, has performed four successful hear transplants.

Approximately 1,000 persons with kidney stones have been treated with the lithotripter, which is used to break up gall stones.

The Air Care Program continues to save lives and to contribute to more rapid and complete recovery for many victims of trauma.

In addition to those admitted to the hospital, 30,726 persons were seen in the outpatient clinic, 35,134 in the emergency department, and 196,556 in the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics, 2,747 patients had outpatient surgery.

The Pastoral Care Department continues to provide pastoral services for hospital patients. In addition, the department has provided assistance to more than 100 pastors and their families through the Minister's Care Plan.

Baptist Hospital received, during the past fiscal year, the largest offering from the churches in its history, \$1,083,051,000. For these gifts and for all other continuing support from Baptist churches, the hospital trustees, staff and patients are grateful.

3. Baptist Retirement Homes, Inc.

This year the "Homes" adopted plans to move forward in three broad directions:

- 1. Advocacy for Older Adults. The staff has been making efforts to help Baptists to understand the particular needs of older adults and to be aware of the significant contributions that older adults can make to the well-being of the churches and associations in the State.
- 2. Quality Care. The "Homes" continued to develop creative ways to meet the needs of older adults. One example is the arrangement with the Geriatric Section of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine to give intermediate and skilled nursing to residents and patients.
- 3. Plans for institutional expansion and new development. A long-range plan has been developed for constructing facilities in Asheville, Charlotte and in the East. This year "Ground-breaking" for a new Continuing Care Retirement Community in Winston-Salem is planned for the fall.

The "Good News" of Jesus Christ is the presupposition upon which the "Homes" operates. In reaching out in service to older adults, the "Homes offers concrete expression to the love of the Christ for all people. The support of North Carolina Baptists makes this ministry of love possible.

6. Christian Higher Education

The following summary of a recent survey of 24,000 lay persons and pastors in North Carolina reveal strong attitudes toward Baptist colleges. The survey conclusions are as follows:

1. About 99 percent stated that Christian education should remain a high priority in North Carolina Baptist life.

2. More than 80 percent rated North Carolina Baptist colleges as outstanding or good. Ninety-five percent believe that the quality of education is equal or superior to an education at a state school.

3. Three main strengths of Baptist schools include quality of education offered, Christian commitment of faculty and the spiritual emphasis on the campus.

4. More said that they learned through the Biblical Recorder than in the local church about information pertaining to Baptist colleges.

5. Forty-five percent felt that Cooperative Program funds for Christian education was "about right" while 37.8 percent felt that the percentage was "not enough".

6. Respondents to the survey were 29 percent women and 40 percent lay persons. Eighty-four percent were from churches with memberships between 100 and 999.

The survey encourages Baptist colleges to excel even more.

X. Historical Events in the Churches

ABERDEEN: Missions emphases observed: Foreign led by Vivian Simpson, Home led by Marion Moss and Debbie Marks. Also hosted the WMU Annual Meeting in March and a church-wide project for migrant missions was held in June. Participated in community Easter and Thanksgiving services. These were the special events in December: Annual Christmas Dinner and Program; choir presented Christmas Cantata, "We Wish You a Merry Christmas," at Seven Lakes Chapel, Keen-Agers presented program at Manor Care Nursing Facility, Handbell Christmas concert and Christmas Cantata at church. In January, there was a youth reteat in Gatlinburg, Tennessee. Bruce Hill, Minister of Music and Youth, resigned, effective February 23, 1987. Also in February, the BSU Choir from UNC-Chapel Hill presented a concert. Participated in survey for North Carolina Baptist State Convention April 12. Baby Dedication was held on Mother's Day, and Charlotte Hartson was called as pianist. The Phileo Ministry Committee was named on May 19. On June 7, Keen-Ager Choir and Children's Choir presented musical, "Side By Side." During the summer months special events were: Youth trip to Six Flags Over Georgia, special concert by Young Adult Ensemble from Eastern Hills Baptist Church in Charlotte, Blue Softball Team wins Church League Tournament and State Champship in Wilmington, and Kitchen Facilities Improvement Fund started. (Alease Fowler)

BEAVER CREEK: We have had a busy but productive year. We had two revivals during the church year. We instituted a new mission program in our church this year, "Faith Promise Mission Program"; the money being sent to missionaries on foreign fields. This is the third year of our monthly prison ministry to McCain Prison. Our WMU was very active, raising money with a yard sale. They purchased a high speed tape duplicator for our tape ministry, along with tapes and other equipment needed. We now have a weekly tape ministry in seven homes of shut-ins. For the second year, we used rice bowl banks to collect an offering for World Hunger - totaling \$165.00 to Southern Baptist World Hunger Relief. Our church has also been able to maintain a small food closet, this year giving out ten boxes of food to needy families. We also have a quarterly ministry at the Convalescent Care Center of Sanford. In June we had Senior Citizens Sunday. The church took up an offering to allow the pastor to attend the Billy Graham School of Evangelism: a love offering also was given to the pastor and his family before his vacation. Donations from a couple of families put a new rug in the basement. A missionary speaker talked with our church in the spring. Our prayer is that next year we can do more for the Lord to win souls for Christ.

BETHLEHEM: Weeks of Prayer for Foreign, Home, State and Associational missions were observed. Dr. Wayne Adams got the Week of Prayer for Foreign missions off to a good start by telling about his mission work in Togo. To begin the Week of Prayer for Home missions, a drama, "Who Will Win America," was presented by adults in the morning worship hour. Christmas observance began with an open house at the pastorium. Children and youth made ornaments and decorated a Christmas tree. A play was presented, "The Visiting King." The college students conducted the entire worship service on Student Day at Christmas December 28. High school and college graduates were honored with a breakfast at the pastorium, and were also recognized at the morning worship hour. At the close of the service, the congregation sang "Happy Birthday" to Rev. Gentry and presented him a birthday cake and gifts. Mothers were honored on Mother's Day. Several of the senior adults attended the Senior Adult Fellowship Dinner at Sheraton Inn. Some of the GAs attended Munda Vista, the

Young Adult Sunday School Class enjoyed a retreat at Wrightsville Beach, and the youth at Myrtle Beach. Baptist Men's Day and Youth Sunday were observed with men and youth in charge of the service. A new pictorial directory for the church is in the process of being completed. Rev. Roy Barbee was the guest speaker for the spring revival. In 1987 the church building was improved by covering the overhang and exposed wood with vinyl siding. (Geneva Gordon)

BEULAH HILL: On their 50th wedding anniversary, Rev. and Mrs. Gilmore were honored by their children. Mission projects for the church include: 1) The church van and U-Haul carried a load of clothing to Rock Cave Baptist Church in West Virginia. 2) We contributed \$2,400. to the mission of Rock Cave Baptist Church and a total of \$727.25 to help feed the hungry there. 3) \$2,597.84 was given to World Hunger. 4) \$2,026.00 was given to Cameron Boys Home. 5) \$1,825.50 was given to Lottie Moon. On November 16, Mr. and Mrs. Gilmore were recognized for 36 years of service to Beulah Hill Church. Spring revival was conducted by Rev. Bob Schwartz. On July 30, Rev. Gilmore retired. They were presented placques and a gift of money for every year they served. Rev. Paul Nickens has been preaching during interim. \$4,561.00 has been received for the construction of a building for the church van. A new sound system has been installed. (Juanita Thompson)

CAMERON: The church cleared the lot on the nearby property in preparation for a future fellowship hall. The property at Crain's Creek cemetery is being beautified by the removal of overgrown trees, planting azaleas, placing of uniform markers and constructing service roads. Several maintenance projects were begun to renovate the interior and exterior of the church building. A song service to be held once each month inviting other churches in the community to take part. WMU decided to replace general meetings with a church-wide mission program to proceed each Week of Prayer. Church minutes fro 1921-1986 taken to Wake Forest University for microfilming, thereby completing the duplication of our minutes on microfilm from 1854-1986. Rev. Gerald Bridges of Cool Springs Baptist Church held our spring revival. Greg Burriss was called as Music and Youth Director of Cameron Baptist. Interim Music Director, James Gregory Pilson, was presented a plaque expressing the church's appreciation for his work. Expressed a resolution to oppose the state-wide lottery proposed by the North Carolina Association of Educators and sent it to the North Carolina General Assembly. Purchased a television monitor and VCR for the media use. On Mother's Day, Rev. Eugene Payne and his wife, placed silk roses in the sanctuary and asked the oldest child to present a flower to their mother to represent their love. Our VBS was held at night for the first time. The church minutes of Crain's Creek Missionary Baptist Church (later Cameron Baptist) have been transcribed fro 1854-1900 allowing interested persons to read typewritten format instead of difficult styles of handwriting. The book entitled, Gone and Almost Forgotten: Crain's Creek Community, compiled by James Vann Comer, contains the church minutes (July 1854-December 1891). During a called conference held on the fourth Sabbath in December, 1891, 22 members of Crain's Creek Church present voted unanimously to relocate the church in the town of Cameron, North Carolina. The book entitled When Things were Simple in the Town of Cameron NC, compiled by James Van Comer, contains various newspaper articles detailing the move and church minutes. Deacons recommended to increase the number of annual revivals. Rev. Eugene Payne delivered a God and Country message during the worship July 5th. (Jame Vann Comer)

CARTHAGE: Challenge to Build Program carried out in spring with pledges amounting to \$89,343. Payments of the pledges began on May 31 for a period of 3 years. This

is the greatest project ever undertaken by the church, and the pastor, Rev. James Gibson, and others who were in charge of the Challenge to Build Campaign were highly pleased with the fine response from the church's membership. Funds pledged will be used to carry out much needed renovations and the repairs in the Educational Building and the church sanctuary. First phase, the heating and air conditioning, has been completed and now the second phase is underway, installing new windows. Final phase will be carried out next year in renovating the sanctuary. The membership decided to go the route of Challenge to Build because it means no interest will have to be paid. As far as is known, this is the first project under the Challenge To Build Program ever undertaken in Moore County. (Woodrow Wilhoit)

CALVARY: The church paved the parking lot, installed a new water cooler and put a new microwave in the fellowship hall. We are helping to send our pastor, Eldon Hinegardner, to study in the West Lenior Baptist School of Ministries. (Janet Brewer) EPHESUS: Last year we had a Centennial Celebration and looked back into our past by remembering our forefathers. We continue to hold Sunday School, Morning and Evening services, and our mission programs for all ages. We had two revivals last year, and observed Foreign, Home, and State missions. We observed Baptist Homes and Hospitals by learning their needs and giving money for these needs. We also have reached out in our own community to people in need of spiritual, physical or financial help. Last March, Don and Janet Pittman became our first full-time missionaries to leave from Ephesus. They are located in Ethiopia as vocational missionaries. Guest speakers last year: a Gideon missionary from the Bahamas, and Kobi McKenzie who worked with the migrants in the Sandhills Association, and a prison chaplain, and Billy Graham, our Associational Missionary. We have had many activities last year such as Sunday School parties, Halloween parties, Christmas caroling, Easter Egg hunts, youth ski trip, Joy fellowship activities, Carowinds trip, Waterville trip, and a Mother-Daughter Banquet, and plenty of dinners. (Lynn Perry)

IVES MEMORIAL: During the past year the special events of our church were: 1) Annual homecoming on Sunday, May 3. 2) Replacement of ceiling in our fellowship hall.



IV. Constitution

of the

Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

- (1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.
- (2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.
- (3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

- (1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.
- (2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.
- (3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.
- (4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the Association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be the *Moderator*, *Vice-Moderator*, *Clerk*, *Treasurer*, *Historian*, *Parliamentarian*, *three* (3) *Trustees*, and *Director of Missions*.

Section 2. Departments: This Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occuring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees - (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and Bylaws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Director of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) *Biblical Recorder*, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issued before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following Bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its Bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
 - (b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.
 - (c) Shall be an ex officio member of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. Vice-Moderator: Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk:

- (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
 - (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. Treasurer:

- (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
- (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.
- Section 5. *Historian:* Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.
- Section 6. *Parliamentarian:* Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.
- Section 7. *Trustees:* Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

(a) Search Committee:

1. The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

(b) Conditions of Employment:

- 1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.
- Shall have three (3) weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- 3. May be away from the Association for three (3) weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- 4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
- 5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five (5) Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
- 6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c) Duties:

- 1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- 2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
- 3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.
- 4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.
- 5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
- 6. Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
- 7. Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program(Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.
 - (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audiovisual aid materials and equipment.

- (b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

- (a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.
- (c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

- (a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.
- (b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.
 - (c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.
- (d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.
- (e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
 - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 12. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
 - (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the Association.
- (c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
 - (e) The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such actions as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastors' Conference. The Vice Moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed, recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No Member, Exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of the committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the

Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning churches as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations at it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next

meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The Association may amend or alter the Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

V. Proceedings

of the

Thirty-ninth Annual Session Sandhills Baptist Association

October 17, 1988 LEMON SPRINGS BAPTIST CHURCH

Moderator John Stone called the 39th Annual Session of the Sandhills Baptist Association to order on October 17, 1988, at Lemon Springs Baptist Church.

- 1. An inspiring devotion was given by Rev. Richard Walker, pastor at Beulah Hill Baptist Church, on the thought "be not weary in well-doing."
 - 2. Rev. Tom Barnes, host pastor, extended a cordial welcome to all.
- 3. The Moderator led in singing the hymn, "Send the Light," with Janet Doby of the host church at the piano.
- 4. The Program Chairman, Rev. Charles Hinson, moved that the Order of Service be adopted as printed, with provision for Mr. Herman Russell to present the Budget after the recognition of new ministers, and with any additional revision that the Moderator might deem necessary.
- 5. The Moderator extended greetings and a cordial welcome to all messengers and visitors.
- 6. The Director of Missions recognized the following new ministers: Rev. Jim Harris, pastor, First, West End; Rev. Richard Walker, pastor, Beulah Hill; Rev. Willie Bryant, pastor, Faith; Rev. Hayes Ritter, pastor, Unity Grove, and his son Rev. Tracy Ritter, an ordained Baptist minister; Rev. Robert Wilson, associate pastor, Ephesus; Mr. and Mrs. Don Pittman, volunteer missionaries with the Foreign Mission Board to Ethiopia for one year, Ephesus; Mr. Todd Moore, Minister of Youth, Robbins First; and Mr. C.W. Thompson, graduate student, Southeastern Seminary, Carthage First.
- 7. Mr. Herman Russell presented the 1988-89 Budget. An amendment by Rev. Charles Hinson, WMC director, to add \$250 more to the WMC item was adopted. The Budget was adopted as presented and amended. The Finance Committee found the treasurer's records in good order.
- 8. The Director of Missions gave his report, emphasizing the urgency to reach people and to develop them in the grace of our Lord, and thanked all officers and leaders and churches for their prayers and support for the work of the association.
- 9. The Clerk, Mr. Dewitt Purvis, gave the Digest of Letters Report, showing how there had been some decline in attendance in some of the organizations but strong increases in giving to missions and in total receipts.
 - 10. Dr. Wayne Adams presented the Treasurer's Report which was adopted as given.
- 11. In the absence of Rev. Max Gilmore, Mr. Curtis Bettini, Regional Representative on the General Board, gave the General Board Report.
- 12. Rev. Robert Morrison gave the Missions Department Report, mentioning that an independent Baptist work had begun in Seven Lakes, meeting in the West End school. The association will discuss with them any possibility of cooperating with the association in developing a Southern Baptist work in the Seven Lakes area.
- 13. Rev. Edwin Carroll gave the Youth Report, encouraging youth leaders and youth representatives to participate in the Associational Youth Council meetings, and youth from the churches to involve themselves in associational youth projects.

14. There was no business during miscellaneous business.

- 15. Rev. Ray Holland gave the Associational Building Report, requesting that the association take action on the proposed recommendations at the Tuesday evening session at 7:15 during miscellaneous business.
 - 16. The Moderator led in singing the hymn, "Jesus Shall Reign."

17. The host church choir brought two inspiring messages in song.

18. Rev. J. Billy Graham introduced the speaker, Dr. Robert Culpepper, professor of theology, Southeastern Seminary and former missionary to Japan, who spoke on the "Church," with scripture from 1 Corinthians 12 and 27.

19. Rev. Tom Barnes led in the benediction.

The session was adjourned until Tuesday, October 18, 4:00 p.m. at Pleasant Hill Church.

OCTOBER 18, 1988 PLEASANT HILL BAPTIST CHURCH AFTERNOON SESSION

20. Moderator John Stone called the afternoon session to order and recognized Rev. Hayes Ritter who brought an inspiring devotion.

21. The Moderator led in singing the hymn, "O Zion Haste," with Mrs. Gloria

Holland at the piano.

- 22. Dr. Ray Holland, host pastor, extended a cordial welcome and gave instructions about the facilities.
 - 23. Rev. Eugene Payne gave the Pastoral Ministries Report.

24. Dr. James B. Gibson presented the Seminary Extension Report.

- 25. Rev. Gary McNair gave the Evangelism Report, which included an explanation of the simultaneous revivals in 1990. It was moved and approved that the association participate in the "Here's Hope Simultaneous Revival Crusade", April 1-8, 1990. The associational evangelism council will be formed and will lead the association in preparation for the revivals.
- 26. In the absence of Mrs. Jesse Hales, the Moderator referred to the Senior Adult Report and encouraged the churches to support this work.
- 27. The Sunday School Report was given by Rev. Mike Tillman, Associational VBS Director, for Rev. Don Ballenger, who was attending a conference in Nashville.
- 28. In the absence of Rev. David Helms, who was attending a Senior Adult Conference, the Church Training Report was accepted.

29. Mrs. Sylvia Purvis gave the Library/Media Report, encouraging each church to

develop a church library.

- 30. Rev. Mike Tillman, on behalf of the Ministers' Conference, presented the book, 101 Hymn Stories, in loving memory of Mrs. Margaret Gilmore, faithful companion and co-laborer of Rev. Max Gilmore, to Rev. J. Billy Graham to be placed in the Associational Library/Media Center.
- 31. Mrs. Lois McKenzie gave a report on the Baptist Children's Home with particular emphasis on the local Cameron Boy's Camp. Mrs. McKenzie mentioned that preparation was underway to begin receiving girls who need help. She thanked the churches for

all their prayers and support.

32. Dr. Michael Cogdil, Chairman of the Religion Department, Campbell University, gave the Christian Education Report. Campbell has an enrollment of 1800. Baptists in North Carolina support seven colleges and universities with an enrollment of over 10,000. Rev. Robert Watson gave the Church Extension Report, representing the

denomination. Rev. Watson reported that through the State Missions offering some needy ministers and their families who had come to retirement received some assistance. The association was challenged to reach the lost and to support new work wherever it was needful.

33. Rev. Paul Nickens led in a most meaningful Memorial Service, giving tribute to all our beloved dead; 68 members died since last annual session. Moderator John Stone led

in the singing of the hymn, "Great is Thy Faithfulness."

34. Rev. Charles Hinson gave the World Missions Conference Report, stating that we need a minimum of 22 churches, as we are co-sponsoring the conference with Pee Dee Association, September 21-24, 1989. Each church may send the \$250.00 to the association, which will take care of travel, motel and honorarium for the missionaries. Each participating church will be able to have state, home, and foreign missionaries during the week.

35. In preparation for the annual sermon, Rev. Charles Lassister read the scripture, II Tim. 3:14-48, and led in prayer. Rev. Richard Hodges delivered the annual sermon, using verses from Nehemiah 2, 4, and 6, speaking on the building of the wall, and encouraged us to "rise and build" for the Lord.

36. The host pastor, Dr. Ray Holland, gave instructions concerning the meal and pronounced the blessing. A delicious meal was served by the host church.

EVENING SESSION

37. Mrs. Margaret Hightower led in singing the hymn, "Rescue the Perishing," followed by an inspiring devotion by Rev. Jim Harris. Mrs. Hightower stirred our souls with the singing of "People Need the Lord."

38. During miscellaneous business, the association adopted the Associational Office Building Committee Report by unanimous vote. The recommendations presented in Dr. Holland's report on Monday evening were all adopted, the fund raising will continue toward completion of the land payment and in developing a fund to prepare for building construction of the Training and Resource Center; enlistment of volunteer workers will begin. All churches are encouraged to support the projects so that the ministry and work of the association will be even more effective.

Mrs. Viola Bowlin and Mrs. Bernice Briggs of Ephesus church gave an enthusiastic report concerning the Singles ministry and encouraged churches to develop ministries to singles including divorced, never-married, and widowed persons, and to send some singles to the Singles Conference at the annual retreat at Ridgecrest.

39. In the absence of Mr. Lane Hall, the Moderator suggested that the Brotherhood

report be accepted, commending the work of the director and RA director.

40. The WMU report was given by Mrs. Nancy Gentry who encouraged support for all the missions emphases of our convention and encouraged good preparation for the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering which is essential to our foreign mission work. Rev. and Mrs. Richard Hopkins are considering going to a foreign country for one year in volunteer mission work when they begin retirement in early 1989.

41. In the absence of Mr. Sherrill Lee, Rev. Charles Hinson moved the adoption of

the Committee on Committees Report, which was adopted as given.

42. The Nominations Committee Report was adopted as given by Mr. Jack Hartsell.

43. Rev. Jack Gentry gave the Stewardship Report, expressing appreciation for all the support for the stewardship conferences in 1988-89.

44. Rev. Billy Reynolds gave the Place and Preacher Report which was adopted as given.

45. The Resolutions Report was adopted as presented by Mrs. Fay Boroughs who

gave the report for Geneva Gordon.

46. The Director of Missions made the following recognitions: (1) the members of the Office Building committee for the faithful work during the past year, (2) all the officers and leaders of the association for their faithful leadership to the association, and (3) the churches and churchmembers for their prayers and strong support to all the work of the association.

- 47. Mrs. Lila Hopkins led in a challenging installation service, reminding the officers how the pine cone provided oxygen and life, even so the officers are to show and lead in life-giving services. Rev. J. Billy Graham led in the dedication prayer.
 - 48. Mrs. Margaret Hightower led in singing the hymn, "He Keeps Me Singing."
- 49. The host church choir presented two special numbers in music, which were a blessing to all.
- 50. Rev. Charles Hinson, Program Chairman, introduced Rev. and Mrs. Herman Russell, Jr., missionaries to Malawi, Africa, who brought a most inspiring, informative presentation of the people and the work where they served. Herman is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Russell of Aberdeen First and Joye is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glen Crissman of Ashley Heights. The Russells shared by way of slides and curios. It was our joy to have them make this presentation.
- 51. The Moderator called us to adjournment and led in the benediction. The association adjourned until the next annual session the third Monday and Tuesday in October 1989, at Taylor Memorial and Southern Pines First, respectively.

3. General Board Report

The General Board meets quarterly to conduct the business of the Baptist State Convention between annual meetings. This year the meetings were held in January at Camp Caraway, in May at Mars Hill College and again at Camp Caraway in September.

The General Board is made up of 10 operational committees: Business Management, Church Programs, Communications, Evangelism, Missions, Stewardship, Youth and Campus, Christian Higher Education, and Social Ministries. I am privileged to serve on the Council on Christian Social Services which is concerned with providing a well-integrated program of ministry at the Baptist Children's Homes, The Baptist Retirement Homes, and the Baptist Hospital.

Reports this year indicate that 1988 has been somewhat of a mediocre year financially. Because of this the 1989 proposed Cooperative Program base budget will remain at the 1988 figure of \$27,000,000 plus \$1,000,000 for the Ministers Expanded Annuity Plan, and an extra challenge budget of \$1,000,000.

A glowing report came from Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute indicating that enrollment was up and that "the school is in the best financial shape it has ever been."

The Sao Paulo project is moving forward with more than 50 associations in North Carolina paired with Sao Paulo Associations. Teams of workers from North Carolina have already been at work in Sao Paulo. One of the outstanding features of the General Board Meeting at Camp Caraway in September was special music provided by a men's quartet from Liberdade Baptist Church, City of Sao Paulo.

Words of warning sounded concerning:

- 1. Political activities by churches which could jeopardize their tax-exempt status
- 2. A substantial increase in the cost of Annuity Board Medical Insurance

Several matters of importance to local churches will be presented for approval at the annual meeting of the Baptist State Convention, November 14-16 at Fayetteville, North Carolina. These include:

- 1. New emphasis and responsibilities by the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs on the matter of Substance Abuse/Dependency
- 2. Constitution and Bylaw changes which will radically alter the powers of the Convention President and Vice Presidents
- 3. Alternate ways by which a church may select messengers to the annual meetings of the Baptist State Convention

Thank you for allowing me to serve in this capacity on your behalf.

4. Director of Missions Report

Since last year, Rev. Lowell Brown resigned as pastor at Unity Grove, Rev. Robert Wilson retried from Faith and later accepted the position of associate pastor at Ephesus. We warmly welcome the following new pastors: Rev. Richard Walker, Beulah; Rev. Hayes Ritter, Unity Grove; Rev. Willie Bryant, Faith; and Rev. Jim Harris, West End First. We were saddened at the untimely death of beloved friend and coworker, Margaret Gilmore, devoted church leader and faithful companion to Rev. Max Gilmore, retired pastor of Beulah Hill.

We will continue to seek ways to minister to special groups of people and try to meet special needs. Some of these include: migrants, the retired community, the needy families, and the disabled. We will assist any people who can go as a volunteer to Brazil in partnership evangelism, a project of North Carolina Baptists through 1992.

Let us prepare well for the World Missions Conference in September of 1989, and for the simultaneous revivals of 1990. Rev. Charles Hinson and Rev. Gary McNair, respectively, will serve as directors in these important projects.

In February the team went to a two-day training workshop in Cary.


In March the Vacation Bible School team went to Rockingham for VBS training.

In April the team conducted a clinic for our association VBS workers.



VIII. Committee Reports

1. Associational Office Building Committee Report

The Building Committee, divided into subcommittees, has done a lot of hard work this year in an effort to guide the association in making wise decisions toward constructing a training and resource center that will enhance the effectiveness of all our ministry and work. The full committee has met 11 times, while the various subcommittees have met several times.

The Building Committee is divided into 3 subcommittees: (1) Location: Dewitt Purvis, chairman; Clyde Burge, Max Gilmore; (2) Plans: Barbara Whitaker, chairman; Clayton Holder, Ray Holland; (3) Finance: Tea Godwin, chairman; Carolyn Helms, Jim Blowe. During the year the following were named to the subcommittee on gifts and funding: Fleet Allen, Curtis Bettini, Steve Harris, Margaret Shields, Anthea Tate, and John Westmoreland. The Director of Missions has been working closely on the project which is the subject of his doctoral dissertation. Mr. Ray Adkins has assisted the committee with the schematic and working drawings. Consultants with the Church Architecture Department of the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention also have helped with a study of our work and with additional help on the drawings.

As was approved at the annual meeting last year, our lot has been purchased, a building fund has been established, and the funding and gifts committee has been appointed. Almost \$14,000 is available for payment on the land. Information throughout

the year has been shared with the churches through contact persons, pastors and other key leaders, and the proceedings have been printed in the associational newsletter and in some cases the local newspaper. Appeals have been made to the churches for support, including input on the developing plans and for financial need. Through visiting other associations, careful study and planning, and following the guidelines of the feasibility study, we feel that we have developed excellent plans for our training and resource center. The plans propose a building constructed with a slab floor, brick veneer, thermopane windows, attractive in appearance, energy efficient, flexible in arrangement of floor space, and of low maintenance. Churches and individuals have been giving in various ways, and may choose methods that are best suited for each situation. By volunteer construction, the project could cost up to 40 percent less than by contract. The committee suggests the following plan for fund-raising (keeping in mind that some churches will use some other plan of giving):

(1) Land payment: \$36,000, an amount equivalent to \$7.00 per resident member.

(2) Special Gifts: \$250 - \$1,000 or more, with name put on memorial plaque. Raise approximately \$50,000.

(3) Sale of square feet at \$50 each. Raise up to \$50,000.

(4) Use Memorials to furnish the building.

(5) The Master Plot Plan calls for landscaping and parking space.

(6) Consider a savings account up to \$40,000 in which the interest would be used for maintenance and utilities.

The committee recommends:

(1) Approve the basic floor plan (See copy)


(2) Continue fund raising

(3) Set a goal to begin construction in 1989-90


(4) Begin enlistment of volunteers for construction

3. Baptist Retirement Homes, Inc. Report

The concern of this Baptist institution is to provide quality care for older adults and to serve as a source of information in helping senior adults with particular needs.

- 1) The *Mission* is to provide quality residential opportunities for older adults within a Christian context. It is a ministry of healing and wholeness which gives meaning, purpose, and dignity in enriching their lives. The locations in the state are: Asheville, Hamilton, Yanceyville, Albemarle. A multilevel care facility in Winston-Salem currently ministers to older adults from all over the state.
- 2) The *Need in North Carolina*: Citizens over age 65 will increase by 203,935 (28.9 percent) by 1995 and 286,831 (40.6 percent) by the year 2000. The 80-plus age group is predicted to increase to more than 50 percent by 2000. Thus, the Baptist Retirement Homes, Inc. has launched a bold new program of development and ministry that includes the following: (1) Development of regional continuing care retirement communities; (2) development of a home health care ministry; and (3) development of financial subsidies for retired ministers and ministers' spouses and other older adults with limited financial resources for retirement living. The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life is the older adult population. We hope to turn the opportunities for creative ministry with older adults into reality.

4. Baptist Children's Home Report

A major thrust beyond our quality child care this year was the completion of our Long Range Plans. The five-year plan includes adding two emergency care homes, expanding Cameron Boys Camp to care for 50 boys, and to open two specialized small group homes by early 1989 (a teenage mother-baby home and a behavior change program for teenage girls in Lenoir).

Fifty percent of our children have had little or no spiritual training prior to their being in our care. We rejoice that 79 were baptized into the family of God.

To meet the challenges and continue the current ministry to children, our budget must increase from \$7,000,000 to \$11,000,000 by 1992-93. Increases of church receipts through the Cooperative Program, the Homes and Hospital Offering and designated gifts from churches and individuals will help accomplish these needs. North Carolina Baptists have the future of child care in their hands. We can and must meet the challenge.

Rev. Charles Penley is the new pastor at the Mills Home campus. Rev. Penley is bringing new approaches to ministering to the spiritual needs of our children and to the staff at the Home.

CARTHAGE: During the past year there were three events that stood out in the life of Carthage First Baptist. Most outstanding was paying off the parsonage debt with a gift received from the estate of the late Mattie Bennett in the amount of \$35,000.00. Mrs. Bennett was a long-time, faithful member of the church. During the year there were a number of improvements and renovations carried out in the Educational Building. 





IV. Constitution

of the

Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid

professional staff.

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

- (1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.
- (2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.
- (3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.
- (4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the Association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be the *Moderator*, *Vice-Moderator*, *Clerk*, *Treasurer*, *Historian*, *Parliamentarian*, *three* (3) *Trustees*, and *Director of Missions*.

Section 2. Departments: This Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees - (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and Bylaws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Director of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) *Biblical Recorder*, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issued before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following Bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its Bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
 - (b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.
 - (c) Shall be an ex officio member of all standing committees of the Association.

Section 2. Vice-Moderator: Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk:

- (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
 - (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. Treasurer:

- (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
- (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.
- Section 5. *Historian:* Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.
- Section 6. *Parliamentarian:* Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. *Trustees:* Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

- (a) Search Committee:
 - 1. The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.
- (b) Conditions of Employment:
 - 1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.
 - 2. Shall have three (3) weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.
 - 3. May be away from the Association for three (3) weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
 - 4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
 - 5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five (5) Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
 - 6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c) Duties:

- 1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- 2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
- 3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.
- 4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.
- 5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
- 6. Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
- 7. Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program(Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.
 - (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audiovisual aid materials and equipment.

- (b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

- (a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.
- (c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

- (a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.
- (b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.
 - (c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.
- (d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.
- (e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
 - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 12. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
 - (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the Association.
- (c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
 - (e) The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such actions as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastors' Conference. The Vice Moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed, recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No Member, Exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of the committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning churches as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations at it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The Association may amend or alter the Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

V. Proceedings

of the

Fortieth Annual Session Sandhills Baptist Association

October 16, 1989

TAYLOR MEMORIAL BAPTIST CHURCH

1. Registration of messengers and visitors for the fortieth annual session began at 6:30 p.m. At 6:30 p.m., the moderator called the session to order. Rev. Charlie Taylor gave an inspiring devotion from John 7:37-39. The host pastor, Rev. Richard Hodges, extended a cordial welcome and led in the singing of the hymn, "To God be the Glory." Mrs. Karen Laton was organist and Mrs. Carla Hodges was pianist for the session.

2. Moderator John Stone called on Rev. David Helms, chairperson for the Program Committee, to bring the recommendation for the order of business. The program was adopted as presented by the committee, inclusive of any necessary changes that may occur.

3. The director of missions gave his report and moved the adoption of the following six recommendations for the coming year: (1) seek to double the number of baptisms, (2) complete the payment on the land and move to Phase II in the building program (construction funding from donors who can give large gifts and the enlistment of volunteers for the construction), (3) prepare and send two partnership teams to Sao Paulo, Brazil, (4) affirm and support the establishment of a new Hispanic mission, (5) seek to strengthen the ties of fellowship in our sister churches and to work toward reconciliation in the larger Southern Baptist family, and (6) cooperate with and support the development of the Coalition for Human Care as we seek to minister to human need in our area. The report and the recommendations were adopted unanimously.

4. The moderator recognized and welcomed all messengers and visitors. The director of missions extended a warm welcome to Rev. and Mrs. Jimmy Phillips and family in their assuming the New Home pastorate in June of this year.

5. The clerk gave the digest of letters and Clerk's Report which included some of the highlights of the three associational board meetings of the previous year. Support for missions, total receipts in the churches, and additions in the membership continued to show increases. The churches are now receiving over \$2 million a year in receipts. Baptisms were down from the previous year. Support for the association continued to grow with increases in giving.

6. The 1989-90 budget was presented by Glen Crissman. Rev. Rick Hodges moved that we include another item (Hispanic Mission) of \$3,600 in the budget, rather than receive

it "over and above" the budget. The budget was approved as amended.

7. Rev. Max Gilmore gave the General Board Report. Several items of importance, including the vote on the name change for Wingate College to Cannon-Wingate University and separate offerings for the Children's Home, the Hospital, and the Retirement Homes will be taken at the state convention in November. Mr. Curtis Bettini continues to serve as special representative on the General Board representing Region 4.

8. The WMU Report was given by Mrs. Nancy Gentry. Churches are encouraged to give strong support for missions education and missions action. Churches needing help with the women's mission work or with the auxiliaries are encouraged to call one of the

associational WMU officers.

- 9. Rev. Edwin Carroll gave the Youth Report, asking that all churches seek to strengthen their ministries with the youth, and to send the names of church youth leaders to him or to the associational office.
- 10. During miscellaneous business Rev. Charles Hinson, WMC coordinator, reported that the World Missions Conference held in September was a great success. Despite hurricane Hugo in the early part of the conference, there was good response to the missionary speakers. The amount of funds for the WMC was \$6,250, but the amount disbursed for travel, motel, and honorarium was \$6,463.26. The projected amount needed was exceeded by \$213.26, which came from the State Missions refund. Motel charges at Sheraton were higher than had been expected, but the services from the motel were excellent. The total attendance for the five services came to 4,906 with 21 churches participating. There was one profession of faith and two decisions for full-time Christian service. Several rededications were reported.
- 11. The Office Building Report was given by Dr. Ray Holland, chairperson, and the director of missions. A review of the work of the committee was presented, including the work of the three subcommittees (location, plans, and funding). The director of missions reported on the various ways that the training and resource center would be used and how it would be of benefit to the work of the association and would be a credit to the name of Baptists. It was noted that the plans were ready and that Curtis Bettini and Steve Harris had agreed to serve as supervisors on the building project when the time for construction was ready. The construction can begin when approximately \$50,000 has been received in construction funding and when the volunteer workers for construction have been enlisted. An appeal for contributions for support of the project was made by the chairperson. Several persons indicated that they wanted to make some kind of financial contribution.
- 12. Rev. Rick Hodges led in the singing of the hymn, "Face to Face." Then he led in singing the new hymn, "Churches in Association" by Hamrick, which is part of the fortieth celebration. The hymn was used at the recent director of missions' convocation held at Ridgecrest and is as follows:

Churches in association,
Freely joined in one accord;
Linking hearts and hands together,
Reaching out to share His Word,
Guided by the Holy Spirit,
Ever heeding Jesus' call,
Dreaming, planning, teaching, doing
In association all.

Lord, we pray for global vision Seeing millions lost in sin.
Lord, we pray for holy purpose Going forth the lost to win.
Give us grace to work together Sharing Christ, whate'er befall, Praying, giving, going, telling In association all.

The hymn was sung to the tune of "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing."

13. Following a beautiful solo, "Do You Really Care?" by Rick Hodges, Rev. George Brice, former missionary to Brazil for 20 years, brought an informative, stirring message on missions. Moderator John Stone led in the benediction.

October 17, 1989 SOUTHERN PINES FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

Afternoon Session

- 1. Moderator John Stone called the session to order and recognized Anne Graham who brought an inspirational devotion from I John 4:7, 12; John 17:22, 23; and John 13:34.

 2. Eddie Baggett led in the singing of the hymn, "Tell Me the Story of Jesus."

 3. The moderator asked for a standing ovation in congratulations to the director of
- missions in his completion of the doctor of ministry degree from Drew University in May 1989.
- 4. The Evangelism Report was given by Gary McNair who stressed preparation for conducting the "Here's Hope, Jesus Cares for You" revivals in the spring of 1990 and the evangelism and stewardship Witnessing/Giving Life emphasis with a seminar to be given on May 31, 1990. O.D. Martin and Vic Cole will lead the seminar.

 5. Mrs. Jessie Hales gave the Senior Adult Report, encouraging churches to develop

strong senior adult programs.

- 6. The Sunday School Report was given by Don Ballenger. Churches are encouraged to make strong efforts in outreach. The Sunday School ASSIST team is available for help to churches.
- 7. The Treasurer's Report was given by Wayne Adams who expressed appreciation to the churches for the strong financial support for the association. The land for the new building is almost completely paid for and the budget is in good shape.

 8. The following representatives from convention agencies and schools were rec-
- ognized: Tom Stogsdill of Wingate College who spoke briefly on the proposed name change to "Cannon-Wingate University"; Earl Howard, consultant with the Church Extension Department; and Joe Kloonz, Baptist Youth and Campus Ministry Department, who is the "Care" staff convention person assigned to Sandhills Association.

Informative reports were given by Rev. Bill Stillerman of the Baptist Retirement Homes who stressed the need for providing for senior adults and told of the ministries of the retirement homes of the convention, and Dr. Joe Jones of the Christian Life Council who spoke on his ministry concerning drug abuse. A 51 minute film, The Bible and Drug Addiction, is available to the churches from the convention.

- 9. Rev. Max Gilmore led in an appropriate, inspirational memorial service honoring the beloved dead of our association. Rev. Gilmore used Scripture from Rev. 14:13, Heb. 11:10, and II Tim. 4:6-8 that referred to the reward of the faithful who labored faithfully for our Lord and for the crown of righteousness that is reserved in heaven for God's people. Following prayer by Rev. Mike Ray, Ed Baggett led in singing of the hymn, "O That Will Be Glory."
- 10. The director of missions introduced Mrs. Max Gilmore, the former Lorraine Parsons of the Laurel Hills Baptist Church, congratulated the Gilmores on their marriage in June, and welcomed her into our fellowship.
 - 11. A trio from Southern Pines First Baptist Church provided special music.
- 12. Rev. John Stone read the Scripture from Romans 10:9-17 and introduced Rev. Bob Schwartz, pastor of Beaver Creek Baptist Church, who brought a stirring message on "Where there is no vision, the people perish." from Prov. 29:18.

 13. The deacon chairman of Southern Pines First Church, Eddie Davis, led in the prayer
- of thanksgiving for the evening meal that was provided by the host church and enjoyed by all.

- 14. The evening session began with the singing of the hymn, "O Zion Haste," led by Eddie Baggett. Tim Coe, layperson from Red Branch Church, gave the devotion from Romans 8:28-39. He spoke of how all things worked together for good and how God was with God's people in all things, no matter what the circumstances. He encouraged prayer for himself and the group that was preparing to go to Brazil in October in the partnership with Sao Paulo.
- 15. A beautiful rendition of the song, "Hope in the Name of the Lord," was given by Margaret Hightower.
- 16. During miscellaneous business Bob Morrison recommended that the Credentials Committee visit with two churches that are not supporting the association and encourage them to comply with the provisions for membership as stated in the Constitution, and to report back to the association on their findings at the next annual session. Moderator John Stone referred the matter to the Credentials Committee and offered any assistance that he may give.

The director of missions gave the Credentials Report which is as follows:

On October 11, 1989, Victory Baptist Church voted to request to come under the watchcare of the Sandhills Baptist Association pursuant to full membership in the association.

This church came into being about five years ago and has experienced slow but steady growth. The active membership is now approximately 45 members. It now occupies a comfortable and commodious building which will be debt-free by the end of 1989. Their organization, doctrines, and practices are typical of a Southern Baptist church. The church building is located on state road no. 1251, about half way between Pinehurst

The church building is located on state road no. 1251, about half way between Pinehurst and Carthage. Rev. Max A. Gilmore has been supplying as pastor for the past year.

The Credentials Committee recommends that this request be granted.

The report was prepared by the committee and submitted by Max Gilmore, chairman, and Charles Lassiter. The director of missions has visited with the deacons and discussed various matters pertaining to affiliation with the association, and has preached to the congregation. The motion was adopted by unanimous consent. Ten members from Victory Baptist Church were present and celebrated the occasion of their membership into the association. Rev. Max Gilmore spoke to the report and encouraged the support of the presentation.

17. The Missions Department Report was given by Rev. Bob Morrison who spoke of the development of the new Hispanic mission and introduced Rev. Cirilo Sanchez who extended greetings in English and Spanish and sang a solo in Spanish, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus." The association is helping support Rev. Sanchez and the Hispanic work in cooperation with the Pee Dee Association and the Language Missions Department of the Baptist State Convention. Churches giving directly to the support of the Hispanic work are encouraged to give their contribution above their ongoing contribution to the associational budget gifts. However, the entire amount will be placed in the associational budget which now includes the Hispanic item.

VI. Officers' Reports

1. Annual Treasurer's Report

The associational board met three times during 1989: January 16 at New Home, May 29 at Bethlehem, and September 18 at Carthage First. Moderator John Stone presided at the January and May meetings; Vice-Moderator Bill Walton presided at the September meeting. There was excellent attendance at the meetings. The smaller attendance was at the May meeting due to Memorial Day weekend.

Reports were received from the associational officers, department directors, and some committee chairpersons. At the January Board meeting the association voted to cooperate and support the North Carolina-São Paulo, Brazil Partnership, working with three associations (Randolph, Montgomery, and Sandy Creek) in preparing and sending teams to Brazil. The annual calendar was adopted and the 1988-89 budget was presented for information and study at the May Board meeting. The recommendation of the Finance Committee to transfer the Seven Lakes mission fund to the association building fund was approved, with the understanding that any church that chose to do so may request a refund of any Seven Lakes contribution. Also, the recommendation to transfer the association equipment fund to the operating budget was adopted.

At the September Board meeting the association voted that the Associational Board would begin meeting for its 1990 meetings at 7:30 p.m. The Assoc. Executive Committee will meet at 6:30 p.m., one hour before the Board meets. The Missions Department moved that the association approve and support the project to help start a Hispanic mission church. The provisions would be that Ephesus Baptist Church would serve as the Mother Church, the Baptist State Convention would give \$4,000 a year for three years to the project, and

member churches that desired to do so would contribute an amount over and above the associational budget. The Pee Dee Association would contribute another \$4,000 toward the support of the Hispanic pastor, Cirilo Sanchez, and seek to begin another mission church at Ellerbe. The association voted to approve this project and another motion to incorporate, with Mr. Bill Bost providing legal assistance. The association also gave approval to Carolina Telephone company to place a fiber-optic cable under our property on 15-501; the company would contribute \$200 to the association.

3. General Board Report

The quarterly meetings of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina were held this year at Camp Caraway in January, Meredith College in May, and in September at the Baptist Assembly grounds at Fort Caswell.

Pleased was the attitude expressed at the almost completed refurbishing of the buildings and facilities at Caswell. The new Fred and Eudelle Smith Conference Center building has been completed and was dedicated during the September meeting of the General Board. It is a beautiful and commodious addition to our facilities at Caswell.

Financial reports indicate a small increase (about four percent) in Cooperative Program receipts so far this year. The 1990 proposed Cooperative Program base budget is \$27,250,000 plus \$1,050,000 for the Ministers Expanded Annuity Plan and an extra challenge budget of \$1,000,000. To improve financial matters, steps are being taken to

economize at Baptist State Convention headquarters. (1) A freeze is being placed on some unfilled positions, (2) Staff members will be charged four cents per mile for the personal use of Convention owned vehicles.

A number of important matters will be presented for approval at the annual meeting of the Baptist State Convention November 13-15 in Greensboro. These include:

- 1. That the Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes and the Baptist Hospital be allowed to return to receiving separate offerings in 1991, and preferably at the former dates identified for these offerings.
- 2. That the name of WINGATE COLLEGE be changed to CANNON-WINGATE UNIVERSITY.
- 3. The affirmation of the Reverend W. Mack Roberts as the new President of the Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute.
- 4. Several changes in the Constitution and Bylaws, including alternate ways of selecting messengers to the annual meeting of the Convention.

As your representative on the General Board, I would encourage each church to send its full quota of messengers to the annual meetings of the Convention and allow them time for a detailed report of actions taken. In this manner our people will be better informed as to what is going on among the Baptists of North Carolina.

4. Director of Missions Report

During the past year I have attempted to continue in support, encouragement, counsel, teaching, preaching, speaking, and planning in all our ministries of the association. To help communicate, over 600 newsletters were mailed monthly and an occasional "Leadership Update" mailing was sent to key leaders in the churches.

I am indebted to our associational officers and leaders who serve us faithfully. For the past two years John Stone has served us well as moderator. We believe that our Vice-moderator, Bill Walton, will ably serve us, too. Working with our associational department directors we attempted to conduct at least one major training or mission event last year. In particular, there was strong support in attendance for the Senior Adult annual fellowship meeting, the Key Leadership Conference, the Board meetings, the Ministers/wives events, the WMU meetings, and the Deacon training seminar. Twenty-four active and retired pastors participated in the seminar led by Neil Chafin of the Pastoral Care Department on the subject of interim pastors and interims for churches.

Thank you for your support and encouragement in my study for the Doctor of Ministry degree which was awarded in May of 1989. The dissertation was written on one of our associational projects: "The Process of Locating and Planning the Funding and Constructing of a Baptist Associational Training and Resource Center." It is my prayerful desire that the efforts given to this project will not only be of help to our building project, but that it will be of benefit to other associations in our convention.

Some major projects that we have been involved with this year include: the World Missions Conference, Brazil Partnership, "Here's Hope, Jesus Cares for You" revival preparation for the simultaneous campaign in 1990, and the beginning of a new Hispanic mission. We appreciate the leadership of Charles Hinson as WMC Coordinator, Gary McNair as Evangelism director, Bob Morrison as Missions department director, and Cirilo Sanchez

in the Hispanic work. The Brazil Partnership mission project continues through 1992. Any pastor or layperson who desires to go to São Paulo should pray and prepare the necessary funds. Churches are encouraged to support those who feel led of God to make the mission trip. In 1990 we expect to have two groups going, one in May and one in October. The cost is approximately \$1,404. Let us make good preparation for the Here's Hope revivals and give strong, prayerful support to the development of the Hispanic mission.

This year I attended the state director of missions conference at Wingate College and the national convocation at Ridgecrest ("My World, My Mission").

Pray for our sister churches that are seeking pastors: Bethlehem, Calvary, Cameron, and Middle Cross, and for the pastors who recently left these churches to other ministries. The association is glad to welcome back Rev. and Mrs. Jimmy Phillips and family. The Phillips moved to the New Home pastorate in June of 1989.

There are many mission opportunities among us that need our prayerful care and response. The ministries of outreach to the unsaved, to the needy, to the imprisoned, to the residents of nursing care homes are all important. We continue to seek to find ways that we can work together among ourselves and with others in these ministries. May God bless us with strengthening ties in our Baptist family and with increasingly spiritual growth, personally and in our churches.


4. Library/Media Report



VIII. Committee Reports

1. Office Building and Planning Committee Report*

This past year our committee met several times to plan for the construction of our training and resource center. Already, many of the goals of the association have been achieved:

(1) A building site has been selected and purchased according to the guidelines of the feasibility study that will give visibility, accessibility, and convenient use; (2) fund-raising for the land purchase; and (3) development of plans that should result in a building that will be multiple-purpose in use, energy efficient, attractive in appearance, and of low maintenance. Ray Atkins and other local and convention consultants have assisted the committee very well in its planning.

The association is now ready to consider moving into phase two: fund-raising for the construction and the enlistment of volunteers. The fund-raising is to be in two parts: (1) Gifts from large donors, and (2) sale of square feet at \$50 per square foot. Gifts from churches, individuals, and groups will be gladly received. Some churches already are putting the building project in their budget. The enlistment of volunteers will include carpenters, electricians, plumbers, masons, and other laborers. Building contractors, Curt Bettini of Southern Pines First and Steve Harris of Bethlehem, have agreed to supervise the construction.

The process of fund-raising and enlistment of volunteers will be coordinated through the pastors and "contact" persons. The Special Gifts and Funding Committee will help give leadership in fund-raising. It is recommended that a rally be planned after the January Board meeting for the purpose of sharing and preparing to the fullest extent.

After phase two, the project will include furnishings and equipment (that can be done through memorials), paving, and landscaping. A final goal will be to establish a saving fund of approximately \$40,000 so that the interest may be used for maintenance and utilities. As a result, the association would be debt-free. Budget funds could then be used for missions and ministries.


Such a training and resource center would allow our association to conduct multiple ministries, strengthen fellowship, and be more effective in training church members, church and associational leaders. A possible use of the building could be a meeting place for a new mission church, such as the Hispanic mission church. The center will be a credit to the name of Baptists in the area and will enhance the ministries of our churches, the association, and our denomination.

Appreciation is expressed to each committee member who has faithfully been serving with the committee and to all our members and churches and other friends who have supported the project. Let us make these concerns earnest matters of prayer. And with William Carey, let us: "Attempt great things for God, and expect great things from God." With prayer, diligence, hard work, and cooperation in this project, the training and resource center will eventually become a reality.


Membership Growth









Program Enrollment (Graph 1)




Program Enrollment (Graph 2)

IX. Institutions, Agencies and Boards Reports

1. Baptist Foundation Report

"Strengthening for Greater Service" had special meaning for the trust agency of the convention during the past year. The Foundation recommitted itself to greater service to the causes of the convention, its churches, institutions and mission endeavors, continuing the progress of financial support for the past 69 years.

During the past year capital funds were received to construct a building for the development and administration of the Foundation. We hope that the new building to be erected in Cary will be ready for occupancy by the end of the year. None of the emphases on missions, Baptist institutions, and other ministries has been diminished during the cam-

paign to prepare for the building construction.

Total assets of the Foundation is now approaching \$17 million, of which 3.8 million was added in 1988 alone, making this the greatest year of growth in the Foundation's history. Last year, \$1,258,775 was paid to Baptist work and to individuals designated in charitable remainder-type trusts. Donors are assured that heirs are not neglected and that Christian causes will eventually benefit from the estate. We are grateful for the support of Baptists across the state who support the mission and ministry of the Foundation.

2. Baptist Retirement Homes, Inc. Report

For 38 years the Baptist Homes for older adults have been providing care in five locations: Albermarle, Asheville, Hamilton, Winston-Salem, and Yanceyville. In the fall of 1989 a new continuing care retirement home in Winston-Salem will begin operation.

To provide quality care for older adults, a three-pronged long-range plan has been developed by the trustees: (1) Provide regional continuing care retirement communities in the West, the Piedmont, and the East; (2) Develop "free standing" residential housing (independent-living units, and nursing care units), and (3) Develop alternate forms of residential care for older adults (Respite care, Adult Day Care, and Home Health Care).

Providing residential-living situations for older adults in North Carolina is the challenge of the 21st century. This is a great challenge for ministry by the Baptist Retirement Homes.

3. Baptist Hospital Report

During the past year the hospital has grown in facilities and personnel, advancement in medical technology, and the continuation of the spirit of personal concern. The hospital's Christian heritage and its denominational tie undergirds these concerns.

The hospital bed capacity will increase to 806 with the completion of the new North Tower. The Medical Center Boulevard is currently being moved to make ready for expansion of the patient/visitor parking deck. Two new helicopter pads, one for the Air-Care helicopter and a second for helicopters from other medical centers, will be located on top of the parking deck. The J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging will be built on the approximate site of the current helicopter pad. These new facilities will make it possible not only for our hospital to serve more people but to serve them better.

Advances in patient care attract patients from across the country and around the world. Last year the 22,100 persons admitted to Baptist Hospital came from almost every county in our state, from 35 states, and from eight foreign countries. The Department of Pastoral Care continues ministries to patients in the hospital, to family and friends of patients, the medical staff who minister to the patient, the persons requesting counseling in our centers in Winston-Salem, Fayetteville, Morganton, Charlotte, Rockingham, North Wilkesboro, and the ministers who receive clinical instruction.

This past year the hospital received \$668,937.39 through the Cooperative Program and \$303,133.07 through the Homes and Hospital offering, including church gifts directly to the hospital. Appreciation is expressed for the gifts and the services made possible through them.

Group care is provided on campuses at Mills Home, Thomasville; Kennedy Home, Kinston; Odum Home, Pembroke; and Broyhill Home at Clyde. The care is provided for boys and girls (K-12) who need group living, with the majority being teenagers. The referral

and admission process is available to persons and families in North Carolina based on need regardless of sex, race, religion, and nationality. One may contact the nearest intake social worker in the family services center office. Services available, the admission process, and the financial agreement and other matters will be shared through the main office or one of the centers.

Services of the Homes include Therapeutic Camping, Emergency Care, Maternity Care, Child Development for the whole child. These services are available to the Baptist churches of the state.

The Baptist Children's Homes are grateful for all the support provided by Baptists and friends throughout the state.

X. Historical Events in the Churches

ABERDEEN: On November 13 the WMU organizations, Baptist Men and RAs sponsored a Mission Fair in the church fellowship hall. Many Christmas activities were enjoyed: "The Hanging of the Green" on December 4, a special Christmas hymn service on December 11, churchwide Christmas dinner and program on December 14, White Christmas and Adult Choir Concert on December 18, and Community Christmas Eve Communion and Candlelight service on December 24. New pictoral directories arrived with the beginning of the new year. The adult choir presented "Calvary's Love" on March 19. A Bible Drill Team composed of six members from grades 4, 5, and 6 was organized and participated in Bible Drills on the church, association, and state levels. One member, Christy Lee, was a state winner. The senior adult choir presented "America! America!" on May 7. Our children's choir presented the musical play "God with a Capital G" on August 13. Our director of Church Ministries, Debbie Keaton, resigned August 14. A GA recognition service was held on September 10, 1989, with 11 girls being presented Mission Adventures Achievement Awards. Several additions and improvements have taken place in our facilities this year. We have a new church sign on our front lawn the fellowship hall was painted with new curtains, pictures and plants added. New tables and chairs were also purchased for the fellowship hall. The parking lot was paved and new markings installed. A new church van has been ordered. (Alease Fowler)

BEAVER CREEK: We began two new outreach ministries this year. The first one was a weekly service held at Oakridge Retirement Home in Sanford. The second, another prison ministry at the unit in Carthage. We continue to conduct our other outreach programs including tape ministry, convalescent care center, McCain prison, and shut-in visitation. During the year we have had two revival services led by Rev. Bob Morrison and Rev. David McNeill. We added another Sunday School class for the 2-3 year olds. During the Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions we had an international supper. Everyone was asked to bring a dish representing another country. At Christmas we gave our food boxes to needy families in our community, and we had a Christmas program with our choir and children. In January we had our second annual mission conference with three missionaries. We closed the summer out by putting together a new church directory.

BETHLEHEM: Weeks of Prayer for various missions were observed. Offerings exceeded the Foreign Mission goal of \$3,300. Two revivals were held, conducted by Rev. Bob Morrison and Rev. Harold Miller. The Christmas holiday events began with an open house at the pastorium by Rev. and Mrs. Gentry. The youth and children presented a Christmas Carol - "An Angel Journey — Past, Present, Future." "His Star Still Shines" was presented by the adult choir. High school and college graduates were honored with a breakfast at the pastorium. The youth and children choirs presented "Amazing Grace" directed by Nancy Gentry and Renita Hartsell. The church parking lot was paved, and work started on the grounds around the Gazebo, which was located on the site where the old church burned. Rev. Gentry resigned June 11. Paul Nickens is the interim. (Geneva Gordon)

CAMERON: Homecoming was held on October 9, 1988, with speaker, Joe Babb and wife from Henderson, SC. In November Joe Calendine was elected as music director. In December we had a Christmas program and music by adult and children's choirs, and a visit from Santa. JOY club (Just Over Young) met at Cameron Baptist in February. We enjoyed an interesting program and covered dish meal. Irene Marion Group sponsored a cookbook project in March. Rev. Mike Tillman held our spring revival. Mr. and Mrs. Herman Russell, missionaries to Indonesia, led the service on April 16 with Ephesus, Beaver Creek, Vass, and Red Branch visiting. WMU celebrated 100th anniversary at Cameron in May. VBS was held at night with a new class for senior citizens, VBS ending with a picnic and commencement. July 30 was the last sermon for Rev. Eugene Payne. Rev. Robert Wilson is interim pastor. The dedication of the fellowship hall was held on August 27.

CARTHAGE: Highlight during this 1988-89 church year has been continuation of the Challenge to Build program in which various improvements have been carried out. Currently, waterproofing the exterior of the sanctuary area is underway, and when that is completed then it is hoped to move on to the final phase, which will be the sanctuary inside. In the church auditorium, new carpeting, painting, heating system, and some other improvements are to be carried out. When all this is done, that will complete the Challenge to Build program that was implemented back in May 1987 until May 1990, or a period of three years. During this year three members were named Deacon Emeritus: Tom Livengood, Joe Allen, and C.T. Henson, the latter who died recently. They were selected for the long years of service they gave to the church as deacons. (Woodrow Wilhoit) EPHESUS: Our church started a Standard Sunday School program with the help of Robert Wilson. Not only are we ministering to English speaking people, but Spanish as well. Our Hispanic ministry has grown so much that the Home Mission Board, State Baptist Convention, along with Pee Dee and Sandhills Association have hired Cirilo Sanchez to minister to the Hispanics in their own language. He ministers to the Hispanics in our church community through visitation and holds Sunday School and worship services in our fellowship hall. He also holds many Bible study classes and visits many Hispanics throughout the Sandhills and Pee Dee Associations, spreading the Word of God in their own language. Our church held a fall and spring revival this year. We participated in the World Missions Conference with five different missionaries as speakers. We also had a Gideon speaker and several others during the year. Our choir presented a Christmas cantata. Ephesus members strive to meet the spiritual and physical needs of our community. May our Southern Baptist churches never forget the "Great Commission" and let it begin in our own homes and spread all over the world. (Lynn Perry)

FAIRVIEW: The historical highlight for Fairview was the dedication of our new multipurpose building on August 20, 1989. This building is named "Hannon Hall" in memory of Ellis and Ada Hannon who gave land and money to make the building possible. We also commend our people who gave time, money, and prayer to complete the building. Dr. and Mrs. J. Billy Graham and Rev. and Mrs. Bob Clegg from our State Church Building Planning Department took part in the dedication service. A Christmas Open House was held at the parsonage, and we sent money to Carthage Prison to provide Christmas

refreshments. We had a youth team from North Carolina State University to work with our youth one weekend in March. Rev. and Mrs. Dennis Connell, missionaries to Japan, spoke in our church. The pastor and his wife attended school at Campbell University. (Dorothy Carroll)

IVES MEMORIAL: During the past year our church participated in fall and spring revivals, Foreign and Home Mission emphases, and VBS. We had a Christmas program, Candlelight service, and Watchnight service. In February we had a Sweetheart Banquet, and in March an Easter Sunrise service. Homecoming week was in May with Paul West. Much needed repair to our Sunday School rooms was accomplished this year. All Sunday School rooms were painted and new matching ceiling lights, door hardware, shelves and cork boards were installed. In July the WMU and Brotherhood held a joint meeting with Dr. Ray Holland showing films of his trip to Korea. Our goal of \$4,500 was reached during Lottie Moon Week of Prayer. A "Youth Lock In" was enjoyed by our young people on October 28. The children and youth presented a Christmas Cantata, "I Wonder About Christmas." On December 16, after a cookout, the youth group went caroling. Our church was host for the community Thanksgiving service, with Rev. Everett Eason delivering the message. PINE GROVE: Most recently our church had a dedication service for the new 20' x 30' addition to the fellowship hall. It is complete with restrooms and a water cooler. The extra space will most likely be used as an extra Sunday School room. Also, this year our church has been celebrating its centennial. The celebration will peak on October 1, 1989. PINEYWOOD: I want to thank the Lord for a good year at Pineywood Baptist Church. The church put vinyl siding on the parsonage. We also installed new carpet in the fellowship hall and sanctuary. The outside of the church and the fellowship hall were painted, and new hymn books were purchased. (Shirley Lassiter)

PLEASANT HILL: Our church year began with fall revival with a different minister speaking each night. All mission goals were exceeded and two song services were held. (Cos Barnes) VASS: Our youth with leader, Judy Mansfield, enjoyed a day at the State Fair. The youth also donated money to the church for our local missions and clothes to Teen Challenge. Our senior citizens were treated to a Christmas party and dinner at our church. Our Bread Ministry continues to the needy in the area. We all enjoyed our annual church picnic and ball game in the park. Installing guttering and painting the trim on educational building and sanctuary was our main building project for the year. Our church participated in community Thanksgiving and Easter Sunrise services this year. (Belinda McNeill)

IV. Constitution

of the

Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

- (1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.
- (2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.
- (3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

- (1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.
- (2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.
- (3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.
- (4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the Association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be the *Moderator*, *Vice-Moderator*, *Clerk*, *Treasurer*, *Historian*, *Parliamentarian*, *three* (3) *Trustees*, and *Director of Missions*.

Section 2. Departments: This Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees - (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and Bylaws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Director of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) Biblical Recorder, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issued before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following Bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its Bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
 - (b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.
 - (c) Shall be an ex officio member of all standing committees of the Association.
- Section 2. *Vice-Moderator:* Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk:

- (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
 - (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. Treasurer:

- (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
- (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.
- Section 5. *Historian:* Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.
- Section 6. Parliamentarian: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.
- Section 7. *Trustees:* Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

(a) Search Committee:

1. The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

(b) Conditions of Employment:

- 1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.
- 2. Shall have three (3) weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- 3. May be away from the Association for three (3) weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- 4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
- 5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five (5) Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
- 6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c) Duties:

- 1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- 2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.

3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

- Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.
- 5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
- 6. Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
- 7. Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.

(b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program(Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.
 - (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audiovisual aid materials and equipment.

- (b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

- (a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.
- (c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

- (a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.
- (b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.
 - (c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.
- (d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.
- (e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
 - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 12. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
 - (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the Association.
- (c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
 - (e) The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such actions as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastors' Conference. The Vice Moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed, recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No Member, Exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of the committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the

Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning churches as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations at it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of

sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association. ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The Association may amend or alter the Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

V. Proceedings

of the

Forty-first Annual Session Sandhills Baptist Association

October 22, 1990

RED BRANCH BAPTIST CHURCH

1. Registration of messengers and visitors for the forty-first session began at 6:30 p.m. The moderator, Dr. Bill Walton, called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. The devotion from Romans 10:10-15 was brought by Rev. Tom Barnes, pastor of Lemon Springs Baptist Church. Rev. Don Hayes, host pastor, extended a cordial welcome. With Mrs. Mary Lou Caddell at the piano, Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the old hymn, "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations."

2. The moderator recognized Rev. Jim Harris of the Program Committee to bring the recommendation for the order of business. The program was adopted as

presented, inclusive of any necessary change that may be needed.

3. The moderator recognized messengers and visitors. Since the director of missions had not come in from going to the airport to meet the missionary speaker, the moderator called upon Rev. Jim Harris to extend a welcome to the association of all new ministers. New ministers present were Rev. Greg Poplin of Cameron and Rev. Ed Johnson of Bethlehem. Rev. Ronald McNeil of Middle Cross did not attend.

4. The moderator recognized Rev. Max Gilmore to give the Credentials Report. The report had two items: (1) deletion of the Highland Baptist Church from the membership of churches, and (2) the reception of Victory Baptist Church into full

membership in the association. The report was unanimously adopted.

5. The Digest of Letters and Clerk's Report was given by Mr. Dewitt Purvis. The clerk stated that there were increases in every category except three: grand total members, other additions and Brotherhood. The clerk pointed out the increases in baptisms represented people who accepted Christ, and that faith on the part of all the people increased contributions to over one-half million dollars more than last year.

6. The treasurer's report as given by Dr. Wayne Adams, treasurer, was adopted.

Total receipts, including the building fund, was \$84,472.

- 7. Mr. Curt Bettini presented the 1990-91 budget which was adopted as given. Mr. Bettini also stated that the treasurer's books had been audited and was found to be in good order.
- 8. Rev. Max Gilmore gave the General Board report. Rev. Gilmore has served for four years and will be succeeded by Dr. Ray Holland who will begin serving in January 1991. This year the General Board met at Camp Caraway in January, Campbell University in May and at the Baptist Assembly at Ft. Caswell in September.
- 9. During the miscellaneous business period, the moderator requested Mr. Eddie Baggett to lead in the singing of another hymn. Mr. Baggett selected "Blessed Assurance" which all enjoyed singing. Then Mr. and Mrs. C.W. McManus, residents of the Brookridge Retirement Home in Winston-Salem, brought a brief

report encouraging support and prayers for the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina.

10. The Missions Department Director, Rev. Mike Tillman moved to another pastorate. In his absence Rev. Robert Morrison gave a few remarks on the work of the missions department, including the decision of Rev. Cirilo Sanchez to resign from the Hispanic ministry and go the Candor with the Montgomery Association.

11. The WMU report was given the director, Mrs. Deanna Stockwell. Mrs.

Stockwell reported that the WMU has had a most active and successful year.

12. Mr. Lane Hall gave the Brotherhood report, stating that he had enjoyed serving with the association for 16 years as director. There were several workshops and mission projects undertaken by Baptist Men and Boys this year.

13. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the hymn, "O Zion Haste." The Red Branch Church choir, led by Mrs. Inez Butner, was a blessing to all in the singing of the

special music, "I Never Ceased to be Amazed."

14. The director of missions introduced the missionary speaker, Mr. Robert Erwin, foreign missionary to Brazil, who spoke on the Brazil/North Carolina Partnership. His scripture was taken from Matthew Chapter 10. Mr. Erwin, an agricultural missionary, met the team of 12 persons from North Carolina last October. Encouragement was given to pastors and laypersons to consider going to Brazil for a mission project in 1991. From the Sandhills Association Mr. and Mrs. Grady, Mr. Tim Coe and Dr. J. Billy Graham were a part of the partnership in Sao Paulo last year.

The moderator announced that the session would adjourn until the session on the next day at Robbins at 4:00 p.m. Rev. Ed Johnson, pastor at Bethlehem Church, gave the benediction. Following the close of the session, the host church provided delicious refreshments in their fellowship hall.

October 23, 1990 FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, ROBBINS Afternoon Session

- 1. At 4:00 p.m. the moderator called the session to order and recognized Mr. Eddie Baggett who led in singing the hymn, "Onward Christian Soldiers," accompanied by Mrs. Elizabeth Hussy at the piano.
- 2. Rev. Bennie Maness brought an inspirational devotion from Proverbs 30:24-28.
- 3. Rev. Don Ballenger presented the report on evangelism in the absence of the director, Rev. Gary McNair, who moved to another pastorate.
- 4. Mrs. Jessie Hales gave the Senior Adult report, expressing thanks to Cameron Church for hosting the annual senior adult dinner in May. Jessie emphasized Colossians 12:12 and gave it the association for reflection. This was Jessie's last year, after serving for 10 years with faithful service.
- 5. The Sunday School report was given by Rev. Jim Harris who encouraged "breakthrough" to growth and improvement in Sunday School ministry in the churches. Rev. Harris served as VBS director and will serve as ASSISTeam director this year. He thanked all who served on the ASSISTeam this year: Rev. Tom Barnes, Rev. David Helms, Mrs. Virginia Harris and Mrs. Judy Strother. Rev. Don Ballenger will move from the Sunday School department to evangelism director.

6. The reports on Pastoral Ministries and Discipleship Training were listed in the Book of Reports, but were not given. These two departments will sponsor training for deacons and their spouses and for church leaders at Vass Church on the traditional "M" Night in November 1990.

7. Mr. Eddie Baggett gave the music report which included participation of church choirs in singing together at the evangelism rally. There will be a music workshop at

Carthage, February 25, 1991.

8. Mr. Ed Carroll gave the Youth Report and recognized Mr. Joe Clontz, Volunteer director in the Youth and Campus Ministries Department of the Baptist State Convention. Mr. Clontz spoke on the importance of involving youth in Christian ministries while in higher education, and shared of his relationship with the association as "Care Representative" from the Baptist State Convention.

9. Rev. Robert Clegg of the Church Building Planning Department of the Baptist State Convention was recognized and asked to speak on the ways that his department assists churches in building programs. Rev. Clegg has assisted several churches

and the association in developing plans for buildings.

10. Rev. Paul Nickens led in a meaningful memorial service. Following the reading of 70 names of persons who had departed and gone to be with the Lord, Rev. Nickens asked that all stand in silent prayer for these and their families. After a prayer offered by Brother Nickens, Mr. Eddie Baggett led the congregation in singing, "The Church is One Foundation."

11. There was no miscellaneous business. The pastors of the association assembled in the choir loft and sang two hymns: "Amazing Grace," and "Blessed Assurance." There were several "amens." Perhaps the pastors will be asked to sing

again at another time.

- 12. Dr. Ray Holland read the scripture from Nehemiah 2. Pastor Don Hayes of Red Branch Church spoke on the theme of the annual session, "Together We Build." Rev. Hayes spoke of the rebuilding of the wall around Jerusalem and challenged the association to be like Nehemiah and to build the associational building and do better work for the Lord through the better facility.
- 13. The director of missions representing the host church in the absence of a pastor gave instructions concerning the meal. Rev. Greg Poplin was asked to lead in prayer of the blessing for the meal.

Evening Session

- 14. Following the meal Mrs. Jan Williams of the host church gave a prelude and played for the evening session. The music director, Mr. Eddie Baggett led the association in singing the associational hymn, "Churches in Association," to the tune of "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing."
- 15. The moderator recognized the interim pastor, Rev. Joe Waters, who gave a report on his wife, Mary Frances, who had surgery that day and was convalescing nicely at the hospital. An inspiring devotion was given by Rev. Mike T. Ray, former director of missions, who spoke on the passage from II Corinthians 8. Rev. Ray told of how the churches in the first century worked together in Macedonia and encouraged us to follow that example.
- 16. Mrs. Joyce Davis, music major, and member of the host church, beautifully sang the song, "People Need the Lord," inspiring and blessing us all.

17. During the miscellaneous business Dr. Dean Martin, professor at Campbell University, was invited to share some matters about the university. Mr. Paul Daley spoke and showed slides on the progress of the building program at the Cameron Boys Home and expressed appreciation for all the support from individuals and groups in the association. Mr. Curt Bettini has given a great deal of assistance in helping build the new chuckwagon and a warehoue at the home.

18. Dr. Ray Holland presented the associational building report. He reported that more than \$37,000 in cash and \$6,000 plus in pledges had been received toward the \$50,000 matching gift that had been offered by January 1, 1991. Dr. Holland expressed thanks for all the support given toward the project by churches and individuals. The land was completely paid in full; a note-burning ceremony was held on June 24, 1990. The ground-breaking ceremony will be held on November 4, 1990. That will mark the beginning of the construction. Already, several persons have volunteered to help with the construction.

19. The director of missions gave his report stating that most all the goals from last year had been met: beginning of the coalition ministry in Carthage, entering Phase II in the building program; developing the Hispanic ministry and working toward reconciliation in the convention. The number of baptisms increased, but stronger effort needs to be made in order to see a two-fold increase in baptisms.

20. Mrs. Sylvia Purvis gave the report for the Library Services Department, mentioning that the department conducted a workshop in 1990, and will conduct another workshop for librarians at Carthage on February 25, 1991.

21. The report by Mr. Robert Cooke, chairman of the Committee on Committees, was adopted as given.

22. The report presented on the nominations by Mr. C.G. Boyette, chairman, was accepted and approved as given.

23. Rev. Greg Poplin, new Stewardship director, spoke to the stewardship report, encouraging everyone to give generously in the work of the Lord. He will be working with Rev. Don Ballenger in co-sponsoring the emphasis on the Witness-Giving Life.

- 24. Rev. Don Hayes presented the Place and Preacher Report: the preacher for 1991 will be Dr. Ray Holland, with the alternate, Rev. Robert Morrison; the place for the 1992 meetings will be held at Victory on October 19, and Cameron, October 20.
- 25. Mrs. Gloria Holland gave the resolutions report, expressing appreciation to the host churches and all the program personnel.
- 26. The director of missions recognized and presented plaques to Mr. Lane Hall for 16 years of faithful service in Baptist men and Boys work in the association and to Mrs. Jessie Hales for 10 years of faithful leadership with senior adults in the association.
- 27. Rev. John Stone, pastor, First Baptist, Southern Pines, led in the installation of the new officers for 1990-91. The director of missions offered the prayer of dedication for God's guidance and leadership in the lives of the officers.
- 28. In an impressive ceremony the director of missions, the moderator, the director of evangelism, and the director of stewardship signed a declaration of commitment to the Witness-Giving Life, and to help lead our churches in stewardship and evangelism this year and over the next five years. The ceremony was led by the director of missions, and is a part of the five-year program in the convention for Bold Missions.

- 29. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the hymn, "We Are Called to be God's Servants."
- 30. The host church choir, directed by Mrs. Joyce Davis, presented the inspiring special music, "God Can Work Miracles." The moderator then introduced the speaker for the closing message, Dr. James Cammack, former pastor of Synder Memorial Baptist Church, Fayetteville, and presently interim pastor at Carthage First Baptist Church. Dr. Cammack spoke on the theme "Together We Build"..... from the gospel of Matthew, chapter 16, where Jesus referred to Peter as the rock upon which Jesus would build His church. The message was very timely and well received by the association.
- 31. They called the session to adjournment. Rev. Jimmy Phillips, pastor of New Home Church, led in the closing prayer and benediction.





3. General Board Report

It has been an honor to represent the Sandhills Baptist Association on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina for the past four years. I am deeply grateful for having had the opportunity. It has been an eye-opening and educational experience, making me a better informed Baptist.

The regular meetings of the General Board were held this year at Camp Caraway in January, Campbell University in May and at the Baptist Assembly Grounds at

Fort Caswell in September.

The meeting September 25-26 at Caswell has been called, "One of the most important in recent years. Some even speculated it might be the most significant in the past 50 years." The reason being the presenting of a new budget format which would change drastically the way Cooperative Program funds are divided between the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention. After a lengthy discussion the new budget was approved by vote of 62 to 24. This new budget format will be presented for approval at the annual meeting of the Baptist State Convention, November 12-14 in Winston-Salem, NC.

While the new budget dominated time and thought, other matters having to do with Baptist work at home and abroad were discussed and dealt with. Several recommendations will be presented for approval at the annual meeting in Winston-Salem.

These include:

- 1. A New York Partnership to provide budget assistance, church building assistance and assistance to the Manhattan and other mission projects in New York State.
- 2. A new formula for the distribution of funds to the Baptist Colleges and Universities.
- 3. Allowing Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute to award Associate Arts degrees.

The new budget format to be recommended is a very sensitive issue and there is a wide-spread diversity of opinions. The decision made concerning this budget will have far-reaching and long-lasting effects on the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention. I therefore urge each church in the Sandhills Association to send its full quota of messengers to the annual meeting in Winston-Salem and allow them ample time to report back to their respective churches. Our people at home, "Grass Roots", deserve to know what is going on at all levels of Baptist work.

4. Director of Missions Report

Our association is on the threshold of a great undertaking. Within a few weeks we will be celebrating the groundbreaking of our new training and resource center. I am indebted to each of you who have faithfully supported this important project. Our leaders, Dr. Ray Holland, committee members, board members and associational officers have led us well. A generous matching gift offer of \$50,000 by January 1, 1991, by a dedicated member in one of our churches, motivated us to seek to raise

the funds and to begin construction this fall. It appears that we can reach our goal. Many skilled and unskilled volunteers have indicated their willingness to help with the project. Work days will be announced when the project gets underway. The project has been planned from beginning to end with the consistent involvement of church members and with the expectation of a debt free completion. In June we celebrated the note burning, indicating the final payment on our land. On November 4, 1991 we will invite our people to the site for the groundbreaking. Using the plans developed by our committee and drawn by Ray Atkins, under the supervision of building contractors Curt Bettini and Steve Harris, we hope to see the building construction under way before winter. Your prayers, cooperative support through funding and volunteering labor, will make it possible for us to see this project become a reality. Praise God from whom all blessings flow.

This year we engaged in several important projects: (1) the Brazilian Partnership, 12 persons from three associations went to Sao Paulo for two weeks in October 1989 and were blessed by very encouraging results; (2) the Here's Hope revivals, most churches participated and enjoyed good revivals; (3) helped the visiting youth choir, under Bruce Hill's direction, to conduct five Backyard VBS projects, present the musical, "People Need the Lord," in three prison units and at two churches; (4) helped organize the Coalition for Human Care in the Carthage area; (5) began and supported the Hispanic ministry, working with Rev. Cirilo Sanchez, who stayed with us for eight months: (6) participated in several workshops and clinics, working with the associational leaders. Receiving good response and good attendance includthe senior adult fellowship dinner meeting, the youth rally, the ministers/spouses fellowships at Russell's Seafood Restaurant and at the home of the Grahams, the Here's Hope evangelism rally at Aberdeen First and the tent revival for the Hispanic people of the area, the Witness-Giving Life seminar at Russell's Seafood Restaurant, and several of the WMU meetings. We are thankful that through the revivals, the youth project, and the mission trip to Brazil, there were many professions of faith.

The Lord provided excellent leadership for eight of our churches during the interim period. We are pleased to welcome Rev. Bennie Maness as pastor at Calvary, Rev. Ronald McNeil at Middle Cross, Rev. Greg Poplin at Cameron, and Rev. Ed Johnson at Bethlehem. Four churches continue searching for pastors: Ashley Heights, Beulah Hill, Carthage and Robbins. Our prayers and best wishes continue with Pastors Gary McNair, James B. Gibson, and Mike Tillman who moved to other ministries. And also we particularly want to express deepest thanks to Jessie Hales, senior adult director and to Lane Hall, Baptist Men's director, for their many years of faithful service in the association. May our Lord bless each of these and all our leaders who serve us well.

As we look to the future, the building project is an immediate priority. However, we will continue with balanced ministries in all the areas of our work and look beyond the building to providing even more effective ministry through better teaching, training and resources. Thank God for the harmony and good will in our association. Continue to pray for our convention that there will be unity in diversity, and that we not be hindered in doing God's will. It is a joy to serve as your director.

VII. Department Directors' Reports

1. Brotherhood Report

In the Brotherhood Department we strive to provide the best of missions education and mission action for Baptist Men and RA's. We attended several workshops and board meetings during the year at Caraway and elsewhere across our state in order to share with the churches of our association.

On October 9, 1989, we met at Ephesus Church for our annual associational workshop with three groups of men being led by our Baptist State Convention Baptist Men's staff from Cary. It was a most informative and good workshop.

On the fourth Sunday in January we observed Baptist Men's Day across our convention. Many of our churches participated and had some good experiences.

On August 13, 1990, we met at Pleasant Hill Baptist Church at 7:30 p.m. for our annual Brotherhood Rally. An excellent program was given by Brother Billy Graham and two laymen, Grady Culler from Southern Pines Church and Tim Coe from Red Branch Church. They shared experiences about a mission trip in October 1989 to Sao Paulo, Brazil. It was a most exciting experience and was enjoyed by everyone. The program was followed by a watermelon cutting given by Sherrill Lee from Aberdeen Church and Jimmy Melton from Taylor Memorial Church.

On August 27, 1990, we met at Carthage Baptist Church for our associational Key Leader Conference. This training was for Baptist Men and RA officers and leaders

in being more effective in our mission endeavors.

Many men in churches across our association have been involved in a variety of missions - some in the local community with people who are hurting in a number of ways, others working in prison ministry in our local prisons, others out in personal witnessing, others working with migrant workers, and others working out across our state, our country and the world sharing the love of Jesus Christ.

Immediately after Hurricane Hugo's path of destruction on September 21-22, 1989, I went down to the Santee Baptist Association in South Carolina. I went on the 22nd, the day the storm ended. I had a hard time getting there due to so many houses, other buildings and trees blocking the roads. There were so many people left

homeless.

After I got back, local churches and other local individuals starting donating food, clothing, money, toilet articles, blankets and other useful items for the families. We immediately started taking these supplies down there, a van load at a time. We took a total of 13 van loads and four trailer loads. We took these items to the rural people. We gave to people as we found them in need. We made stops like this until we were unloaded. Each of the next trips we did the same way but along other roads. This way all the items were put to good use where they were needed the most. Our local people contributed more than they probably will ever know.

We praise the Lord for His many blessings!

5. Missions Department Report

Rev. Mike Tillman, department director, moved from a good ministry at Robbins Church to another ministry near Reidsville. This year Rev. Tillman met often with the director of missions and sometimes with Rev. Robert Morrison and others in helping our association with various mission ministries, particularly in developing a ministry to Hispanics. In cooperation with Pee Dee Association and the Baptist State Convention, we jointly sponsored an Hispanic ministry in support of Rev. Cirilo Sanchez, pastor. Rev. Sanchez ministered weekly at the Ephesus Church and at Robbins Church. These ministries and a tent revival meeting near Eagle Springs resulted in several professions of faith. The association through the WMU and other groups contributed health kits and some literature and Bibles. The association still seeks to minister to migrants and other Spanish speaking persons in the area. Let us prayerfully consider ways that we can reach these people with the gospel and to help minister to their needs.

The missions department and the youth department helped sponsor the visiting choir from Alabama, under the direction of Mr. Bruce Hill. Also the Sunday School department shared in assisting with the project in helping provide locations for Vacation Bible Clubs. The choir sang in three prisons and at two churches as well as conducting five Backyard Bible Clubs within the association. Several professions of faith were reported, mostly at the three prison services.

This year Rev. Robert Schwartz, pastor, Beaver Creek, has consented to serve as our Missions Department director. We hope to survey needs among our churches and in our communities and seek to enlarge our mission ministries. We hope to develop our missions council and to involve many of our people in ministry to prisons, nursing homes, to the needy and in new work as needed. Represented on the council will be key persons from Sunday School, WMU and Baptist Men. Let us pray for and support missions ministries under Brother Schwartz and in cooperation with the association.

6. Music Report

Music is an important part in the life of Baptist churches. It has played a tremendous role in the worship experience of Christian congregations all the way back to Old Testament days. Music not only ministers to the needs of Christians, but it also helps to touch the lives of non-believers as they learn of God's love.

The Church Music Department of the Baptist State Convention provides help for the church both large and small. Three day music schools can be tailored to meet the needs of a particular church and can be planned in cooperation with the music department, the pastor and the music director. In 1989-90 our association sponsored a music workshop which was primarily used to prepare a mass choir to sing at the evangelism rally prior to the Here's Hope revivals. The music workshop for our association this year will be held on February 25, 1991, at the Carthage Church at 7:00 p.m. Plan to send your choir director and instrumentalists.

7. Pastoral Ministries Report

Rev. Eugene Payne served as Pastoral Ministries director since the beginning of this department. These ministries are still in the developmental stage. There are many opportunities available for training of ministers and deacons. This department seeks to encourage the development and enhancing of the skills of ministry. This is done through seminars that offer help to groups, or it may be done on an individual basis by utilizing resources available. When Rev. Payne moved to another pastorate, Rev. Jesse Mansfield was elected to serve as director of this department.

In November of 1989 this department, in cooperation with the Discipleship Training department, sponsored a deacon ministry workshop at Fairview. Several deacons from the churches were present to view the three selections of video tapes on deacon ministry. X. Historical Events in the Churches

Aberdeen

On October 1, we held a Sunday School cookout followed by vesper service. Darrell and Donna Cheek gave a special program on the trip to India on October 11. In November we participated in Community Thanksgiving service and Rev. Earl Far-"Hanging of the Greens" took place on thing taught Foreign Mission Study. December 3, with the entire church decorating for the Christmas season. These events also took place in December: White Christmas in Sunday School, Adult Choir Christmas Cantata, "Home for Christmas" and Community Christmas Eve Service. January 14 was Soul Winning Commitment Day; Lois and Grady Culler had a presentation of the mission trip to Brazil on the 17th. In February, Home Mission Study was led by Bob and Fern Morrison. "Here's Hope Revival" led by Rev. Paul Nickens in April. Several Youth choirs presented musicals this past year: Youth from Camden, South Carolina - "Live it to the Max", (July 22), Youth team from Alabama, led by Bruce Hill in August, "The Greatest Show on Heaven and Earth" (August 12); and the "Voyagers", a young adult enesemble from Charlotte, led by Margaret Butler, (April 22). In May, we observed Senior Adult Day, and a Teacher Workshop was led by Dr. Howard G. Hendricks. On July 15, our church held a churchwide mission project to help migrant ministry in the area.
