



IV. Constitution

of the

Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to assist in the cooperation of missionary Baptist churches of Moore County and adjacent territories.

Section 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, Associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this Association having a membership up to one hundred (100) shall be entitled to four (4) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight (8) messengers.

(2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.

(3) Duly elected officers of the Association, Department Directors, Chairpersons of all standing committees and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

(1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the Association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the Association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Com-

mittee.

- (3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the Association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Associational Board or the Association.
- (4) The Association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the Association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two (2) consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the Moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the Association. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The Association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the Association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the Association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

- Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be the *Moderator*, *Vice-Moderator*, *Clerk*, *Treasurer*, *Historian*, *Parliamentarian*, *three* (3) *Trustees*, and *Director of Missions*.
- Section 2. Departments: This Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

- Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and Bylaws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher. (10) Resolutions.
- Section 5. Employees: The Director of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.
- Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) *Biblical Recorder*, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The Association may amend or alter the Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issued before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this Association shall be governed by the foregoing Constitution and the following Bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order where not otherwise specified by this Constitution or its Bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the Association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
 - (b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.
 - (c) Shall be an ex officio member of all standing committees of the Association.
- Section 2. *Vice-Moderator:* Shall preside at the pleasure of the Moderator or in the absence of the Moderator and shall be Chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk:

- (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association.
- (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the Association.
 - (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the Associational Budget.

Section 4. Treasurer:

- (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
- (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the Association.
- Section 5. *Historian:* Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the Association.
- Section 6. *Parliamentarian:* Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the Association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.
- Section 7. *Trustees:* Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the Association; shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the Association or Associational Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

(a) Search Committee:

- 1. The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Association Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.
- (b) Conditions of Employment:
 - 1. Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the Association with a 30-day notice.
 - 2. Shall have three (3) weeks vacation with pay; the time to be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.
 - 3. May be away from the Association for three (3) weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
 - 4. Will be limited to revivals in the Association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
 - 5. May serve any church in the Association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five (5) Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the Associational Treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
 - 6. May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the Association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the Association.

(c) Duties:

- 1. Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with the Associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the Association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- 2. Shall give general oversight to work of the Association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
- 3. Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.
- 4. Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, Associational officers, and general church officers.
- 5. Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the Association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
- 6. Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
- 7. Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the Association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Sunday School:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study work in the churches of the Association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 2. Church Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Church Training Program work in the churches of the Association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each Church Training Department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 3. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote Youth work in the churches of the Association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 4. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program(Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 5. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in Association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper Associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the Association.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 6. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the Association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.
 - (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 7. Stewardship Promotion:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian Stewardship in the Association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 8. Library Services:

(a) Shall promote Library Services in the Association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audiovisual aid materials and equipment.

- (b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all department directors of the Association.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 9. Woman's Missionary Union:

- (a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the Association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.
- (c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the Association.

Section 10. Missions:

- (a) Shall lead the Association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.
- (b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the Associational Mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.
 - (c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.
- (d) Shall select a committee from the Association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.
- (e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 11. Senior Citizens:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of Senior Citizens in our Association.
 - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

Section 12. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
 - (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the Association.
- (c) The Chairman of each standing committee of the Association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
 - (e) The President, Vice President, and Secretary of the Associational Youth Council.

This committee shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such actions as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Associational Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the Associational Calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Department Directors, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and Presidents of the Associational Youth Council, and Pastors' Conference. The Vice Moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the Director of Missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the Association.

Section 3. The Committee on Committees: Consisting of five members; shall nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the Association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Consisting of five members, shall present a list of nominations at the Annual Meeting for Associational Officers, Department Directors, and Baptist State Convention Agency Representatives and shall, as needed, recommend to the Associational Board seven (7) members of a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the Associational Treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the Association, chosen so as to reasonably embrace the various geographical areas of the Association. No Member, Exclusive of the Treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the Associational year. It shall be the duty of the committee to draw up and submit the annual Associational budget to the Associational Board for their approval prior to this presentation at the annual Associational meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous financial needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the Association and make a comprehensive report to the Association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall consist of three members and shall plan well in the suggested program of the Association. Copies of the program shall be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors present at the

annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Consisting of four members shall be the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Director of Missions and one member at large from the Association who shall serve as Chairman of the committee and who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association.

This committee shall prepare and recommend changes, amendments and additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the Association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Composed of three members, shall review all applications from churches for membership in the Association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning churches as to its doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with its recommendation, shall be submitted to the Association in annual session or to the Associational Board as provided herein in Article III, Section 2, of the Constitution. This committee may be called upon by the Moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5), of the Constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: Consisting of a Chairman, elected by the Association and all pastors of the Association, shall examine the candidates for the ministry who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the Gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations at it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is required.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Consisting of three members, shall recommend to the Association in annual session, the place or places of the next meeting, and the preacher and alternate of the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Consisting of three members, shall draw up and present to the Association suitable resolutions in appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred to it by the Association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The Association may amend or alter the Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

V. Proceeding

of the

Forty-second Annual Session Sandhills Baptist Association

October 21, 1991 NEW HOME BAPTIST CHURCH

1. A total of 129 messengers and 11 visitors were registered for the session on the first day. Dr. Bill Walton, called the forty-second session to order. The devotion was given by Rev. Greg Poplin, pastor, Cameron Baptist Church, with Scripture from Luke 1:79, John 14:27. The host pastor, Rev. Jimmy Phillips, extended a cordial welcome. New Home Baptist Church pianist, Mrs. Vickie Hicks, was the pianist. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the old hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story."

A motion was made by Rev. Ed Johnson of the Program Committee that the printed order of service, with any necessary changes, be adopted for the proceed-

ings. The motion was approved.

3. The moderator greeted the messengers and visitors and recognized the director of missions who introduced and welcomed the following pastors who came to the association since last year's session: Rev. Ernest Ferrell, Robbins First; Rev. Sandy Yow, Ashley Heights; and Dr. Al Martin, Carthage First. Prayer was asked for Hubert Moss and Ray Maness, brother of Rev. Bennie Maness.

4. Rev. Max Gilmore announced that there was no Credentials Committee Report. Mr. Dewitt Purvis, Clerk, gave the digest of letters and clerk's report. There were increases in every category except discipleship training and total receipts. There were considerable increases in baptisms and new member additions, representing more people born in the kingdom of God. The clerk feels that the annual meeting gets better each year.

6. The treasurer's report was given by Dr. Wayne Adams, Treasurer. Total receipts for year, including the building fund, was \$102,832.95. There is \$3,722.40 in the checking account and \$22,586.05 in the building fund belongs.

ing account and \$22,586.95 in the building fund balance.

7. Mr. Herman Russell presented the 1991-92 budget which was adopted as given. Mr. Russell reported that he had audited the treasurer's books and that they were found to be in good order.

8. Rev. Ray Holland gave the General Board report, stating that he was impressed with the leadership on the General Board, and that business actions went smoothly during the year. Dr. Holland expressed appreciation for the privilege of serving as

association representative on the state board.

9. During the miscellaneous business the moderator recognized Mr. Paul Daley, director, Cameron Boys Home, for a report and some comments on therapeutic camping. Mr. Daley spoke on the theme, "Give a Child a Chance," and mentioned that the camp has improved in quality over the years. He shared encouraging words concerning the several new buildings that enhance the work at the camp.

- 12. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing a congregational hymn, "Wonderful Words of Life."
- 13. The New Home Baptist Church Choir and a trio blessed us with the singing of two songs.
- 14. Rev. Ed Johnson introduced the missionary speaker, Dr. Zeb Moss, vice-president of the foreign mission Board, who brought the evening message. Dr. Moss shared with us some experiences when he was a missionary in Africa, expressed thanks for prayer and financial support of the sending and supporting of our missionaries overseas, and requested that we pray for more missionaries to meet the needs in the world, as we seek to reach a goal of 5,000 missionaries by the year 2,000 A.D. He emphasized in his message that Jesus was the same "yesterday, today, and forever."

The benediction was given by Rev. Sandy Yow, Pastor, Ashley Heights Baptist Church.

Afternoon Session

- 1. At 4:00 p.m. the moderator recognized Eddie Baggett who led in singing of the hymn, "Standing on the Promises," accompanied by Mrs. Karen Chalflinch at the piano.
- 2. Rev. Ed Johnson brought the devotional from Ephesus 3 and John 5:35-40 and led in prayer.
- 3. Rev. Bennie Maness, host pastor, extended greetings and extended a cordial welcome.
- 4. Rev. Don Ballenger gave the evangelism report, encouraging the developing of the witnessing-giving life, and taking advantage of witnessing opportunities.
- 5. Mr. Grady Culler presented the Senior Adult report. Churches were encouraged to send senior adults to the many conferences available at Caraway, Caswell and Ridgecrest.
- 6. Rev. Jim Harris reported for Sunday School, stating that there was an increase of over 50 persons since last year. He challenged us to increase our totals by 150 for next year. The Sunday School emphasis is Embracing God's Word.
- 7. Rev. David Helms gave the Discipleship Training report, encouraging support of Rev. Gary Bodford, new training director for next year.
- 8. Rev. Ed Carroll gave the youth report. Churches were asked to encourage the developing ongoing youth ministries and to participate in the conferences available during the year.
- 9. Mr. Eddie Baggett gave the music report. New hymnals are now on sale at the Baptist Book Stores. He expressed the importance of music in worship.

- 10. Mr. Joe Clontz, Baptist State Convention Youth and Campus Ministries, and a "Care Person," assigned for our association from the convention, extended greetings. - 17. The director of missions gave his report and showed some slides on his recent 12 visits to Taiwan where he served as a foreign missionary from 1963-1968. Dr. Graham expressed thanks for all the prayers and support for an excellent year in associational missions, and reported that the new building when completed would be debt-free. Memorials may be given toward the purchase of furnishings and equipment for the building.
- 18. Mrs. Sylvia Purvis gave the report on the Library/Media department, encouraging the development of church libraries and the use of resources in the association and the convention.
- 19. Mr. Wayne Sheffield presented the report for the Committee on Committees and Rev. John Stone gave the report for the Nominations Committee. A motion was made that both reports be received as given, and that all persons nominated be elected. The motion was unanimously approved.

- 20. Rev. Ed Johnson gave the Seminary Extension report. Pastors and laypersons who want to enroll in seminary classes may enroll for the next classes. If enough persons desire a class, the class will begin in the near future. A listing of classes was distributed.
- 21. Mr. Lane Bullock presented the Place and Preacher report. The preacher for the 1992 session will be Rev. Don Ballenger, with Rev. Ed Carroll as alternate preacher. In 1993, the association will meet with Fairview Church on October 18 at 7:00 p.m. and at Ashley Heights, October 19, at 4:00 p.m.
- 22. The Resolutions report was given by Mrs. Claudia Carpenter of Ives Memorial Church.
- 23. The director of missions recognized Dr. Ray Holland, Mr. Steve Harris, and Mr. Curt Bettini for their leadership in guiding the associational building project and presented them with line chalkers which he brought back from Taiwan. Then, he recognized Dr. Bill Walton, moderator, and presented to him a beautiful plaque in appreciation for his years of faithful service as moderator from 1989-91.
- 24. Rev. Ernest Ferrell invited all the new officers for the year, 1991-92 to come to the front and face him while he offered a challenge of commitment and blessing during the installation ceremony. The director of missions led in the prayer of dedication.
- 25. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the hymn, "Take the Name of Jesus With You," followed by special music by Calvary Baptist Church choir, "I'm Never Alone," "Beautiful Home," and the young adult choir (Son Light choir) sang "The Solid Rock."
- 26. Professor Bill Harris, teacher at Sandhills Community College and member at Fairview Church, introduced Dr. Michael Cogdill, Chairman of the Religion Department, Campbell University, who brought an inspiring message from the Philippians 3:1-11, on the subject, "Something New."
- 27. The moderator presented the gavel to the new moderator, Rev. Bob Morrison who led in the closing prayer and benediction. The forty-second session was adjourned until the next session at Victory and Cameron churches in 1992.





UNITY GROVE: Our church is located on Mt. Carmel Rd. about 4 miles southeast of Robbins. On July 1, 1956, the church was organized as a missionary Baptist Church, by Rev. Paul Gales. On March 12, 1990, the church was totally destroyed by fire. The rebuilding was completed by January 1991. The Director of Missions, Dr. J. Billy Graham, brought the message for the dedication service. Rev. Hayes Ritter is the pastor at this time. (Sonya Cheek)

VASS: Our youth performed puppet programs as part of the morning worship service during the month of December. Children's church was started in February, to be held once a month. Church library was started for church members. Swing set was purchased for childrens use during Bible School and play time in Sunday School. Our Chapel had a "face lift" inside with work done by church members and AA members. (Belinda McNeill)

VICTORY: In October 1990, the annual Sandhills Baptist Association met at Red Branch Baptist Church and Victory Community Baptist Church was recommended from the Credentials Committee, chaired by Rev. Max Gilmore, for a vote to receive Victory into the full fellowship of the Sandhills Baptist Association. Victory Baptist has been actively involved in the support of all facets of the Baptist work. We were among 130 groups to receive free azaleas from the Annual Keep North Carolina Clean and Beautiful, Inc., WRAL-TV. On November 4, 1990, Victory participated in the Groundbreaking Ceremonies for the new Resource Center of the Sandhills Baptist Association. In October, a Harvest Festival was held and the children and adults enjoyed a hay ride, played games, and enjoyed a hot dog supper. In November, we invited 12 boys from the Cameron Boys Home and their leaders to have Thanksgiving Dinner with us and we collected \$1,047.00 to give them for their use and benefit. In December, our youth presented a Christmas play. We held a watchnight service with Rev. Gilmore preaching and we had a breakfast. At the present time we have approximately 140 to 150 attending morning worship services and 90 to 100 on Wednesday night. We have recently started youth activities, Mission Friends, RA's, GA's, in addition to our Acteens. Since October 1990, we have had 27 people to join our church and 18 baptized. We ordained three additional deacons. We paid the fellowship hall in full in April 1991, and started a building fund. As you can see, the Lord is really working in HIS CHURCH. (Patricia R. Chriscoe)

WEST END: The highlight of our church year was the renovation of our church parsonage. The renovations were made possible by a gift given by Mrs. Merlie Wilkie as a memorial. After completion of the renovations, our church held an open house and dedication. (Pam M. Cole)

BEULAH HILL: Five members of the music department took part in a workshop for volunteer music leaders at Camp Caraway. The church voted to purchase the new 1991 Baptist Hymnal. During the year, special musical services were held by the church musicians and the singing groups Serenity, The McLaurins, The Forrest Family, and Southern Harmony. In November, Steve Hale, former UNC basketball star gave his Christian testimony and led in an inspirational service. In addition to a successful Vacation Bible School, a Neighborhood Bible Club for children in the church community was held for the first time. Church youth assisted adults with Bible story enactments, puppetry, and general helps. High attendance for the week was 37. Revival was held in the spring with speaker Rev. Egbert Craven, and in September with speaker Rev. Charles Ledford. (Ken Lloyd, Merry Ann Caddell)







IV. Constitution

of the

Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

Section 2. The objectives of this association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section l. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are elected members of affiliated churches.

- (1) Each church affiliated with this association having a membership up to one hundred members shall be entitled to four messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight messengers.
- (2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.
- (3) Duly elected officers of the association, department directors, chairpersons of all standing committees and the director of missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

- (1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the association subscribes to "The Baptist Faith and Message" adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.
- (2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.
- (3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Association Board or the association.
- (4) The association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the association.
- (5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article,

the moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall its findings to the association. The association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the Association Board is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice, if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the association shall be the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, parliamentarian, three trustees, and director of missions.

Section 2. Departments: This association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship through the following departments -Brotherhood, Discipleship Training, Evangelism, Library Services, Missions, Music, Pastoral Ministries, Senior Adults, Stewardship, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, and Youth. The department directors shall be elected by the association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following committees - Executive, Committee on Committees, Constitution and Bylaws, Credentials, Finance and Audit, Nominations, Ordination, Place and Preacher, Program, and Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The director of missions and any other employee of the association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject of the authority of the Association Board, and be elected by the Association Board or the association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Foundation, Baptist Hospital, Baptist Retirement Homes, *Biblical Recorder*, and Christian Education.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The association may amend or alter the constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist Newsletter in the last issue before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this association shall be governed by the foregoing constitution and the following bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this constitution or its bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
 - (b) Shall be ineligible serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.
- (c) Shall be an ex officio member of all standing committees of the association. Section 2. *Vice-moderator*: Shall preside at the pleasure of the moderator or in the absence of the moderator and shall be the chairperson of the Executive Committee. Section 3. *Clerk*:
 - (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association.
 - (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the association.
 - (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the associational budget. Section 4. *Treasurer*:
 - (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
 - (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the association.
- Section 5. *Historian*: Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the association.
- Section 6. *Parliamentarian*: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.
- Section 7. *Trustees*: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the association; shall handle all legal matters of the association under the direction of the association or Association Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

- (a) Search Committee: The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Associational Board seven members who would serve as a director of missions search committee.
 - (b) Conditions of employment:
 - 1) Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary or the association with a thirty day notice.

- Shall have three weeks vacation with pay; the time will be determined in consultation with Executive Committee.
- 3) May be away from the association for three weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- 4) Will be limited to revivals in the association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
- 5) May serve any church in association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the associational treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
- 6) May serve as serve as chaplain in one institution outside the association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the association.

(c) Duties:

- 1) Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- 2) Shall give general oversight to the work of the association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
- 3) Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.
- 4) Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, associational officers, and general church officers.
- 5) Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
- 6) Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
- 7) Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 2. Discipleship Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Discipleship Training Program in the churches of the association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 3. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.
 - (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 4. Library Services:

- (a) Shall promote library services in the association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audiovisual aid materials and equipment.
 - (b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all churches in the association.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 5. Missions:

- (a) Shall lead the association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.
- (b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the associational mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.
 - (c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.
- (d) Shall select a committee from the association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.
- e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the association.

Section 6. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the association.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 7. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
 - (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 8. Senior Adult:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of senior adults in the association.
 - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
 - (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report

to the association.

Section 9. Stewardship:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian stewardship in the association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 10. Sunday School:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and January Bible Study in the churches of the association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 11. Woman's Missionary Union:

- (a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis is to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.
- (c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 12. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote youth work in the churches of the association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the association.
- (c) The chairpersons of each standing committee of the association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
- (e) The president, vice-president, and secretary of the associational youth council. The Association Board shall act for the association in the interim between its annual sessions. Its duties shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the association as so expressed.

No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such actions as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the association for final disposition. It shall make full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the association shall be the officers of the Association Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches.

Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the associational calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, parliamentarian, director of missions, department directors, chairperson of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and presidents of the associational youth council, and ministers' conference. The vice-moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the director of missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the association.

Section 3. The Committee of Committees: Shall consist of five members who will nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Shall consist of five members who will present at the annual meeting a list of nominations for associational offices, department directors, Baptist State Convention agency representatives, and as needed, recommend to the Associational Board seven members to serve as a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the association, chosen so as to embrace reasonably the various geographical areas of the association. No member, exclusive of the treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the associational year. It shall be the duty of the committee to draw up and submit the annual associational budget to the Associational Board for approval prior to the presentation at the annual meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the association and make a comprehensive report to the association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: Shall consist of three members who shall plan well the program for the annual meeting. Copies of the program shall be distributed to the messengers and visitors at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Shall consist of the following four members - moderator, vice-moderator, director of missions, and one member at large, who shall serve as chairperson of the committee. This committee shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the association. Its duties shall be to prepare and recommend changes, amendments or additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Shall be composed of three members who shall review all applications from churches for membership in the association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning churches as to doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with a recommendation, shall be submitted to association in annual session or to the Associational Board as provided in Article III, Section 2, of

the constitution. This committee may be called upon by the moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2, (5) of the constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: This committee shall consist of a chair-person who is elected by the association and all the pastors in the association. The committee shall examine the candidates who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for the candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Shall consist of three members who will recommend in annual session the place or places of the next meeting and

the preacher and alternate preacher for the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Shall consist of three members who will prepare and present to the association suitable resolutions of appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred by the association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The association may amend or alter the bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of messengers present at an annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment is submitted in writing on the first day of the session for vote on the following day. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the associational newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

V. Proceeding

of the

Forty-third Annual Session
Sandhills Baptist Association

October 19, 1992 VICTORY BAPTIST CHURCH

- 1. Rev. Bob Morrison, moderator, called the forty-third session to order at 7:00 pm. A total of 138 was present, including 47 visitors. Pastor Ernest Ferrell of Robbins First gave the devotion from II Timothy 2:1-4, with emphasis on equipping the believer. The host pastor, Rev. Max Gilmore, extended a cordial welcome to messengers and visitors. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name." Mrs. Kathy Smith accompanied at the piano.
- 2. Rev. Ed Johnson of the Program Committee moved that the order of service be adopted as printed, and to include any necessary change. The motion was adopted.
- 3. The moderator extended greetings to the messengers and visitors; Rev. Joe Clontz, director of student ministries and care person for the association from the Baptist State Convention, was present. The director of missions recognized the new pastors and their spouses: Rev. and Mrs. David Reynolds from Middle Cross Church, Rev. Arehie Stevens from Beulah Hill Church; other new staff persons in the association include Mr. and Mrs. Benny Edwards of Southern Pines First, Mrs. Sandi Ward of Robbins First and Mr. William Elliott IV of Ephesus.
 - 4. Rev. Max Gilmore stated that there was no credentials report.

- 5. The Clerk, Mr. Dewitt Purvis, gave the digest of letters. He reported increases in almost every category and stated that it has been a good year for the association. To date 98.24 percent of the Cooperative Program, SBC, with \$138,234,734.00 of \$140,710,282.00 has been received through September 30, just short of the budget goal by end of the fiscal year. Southern Baptists have missionaries in 110 countries, 38,000 churches, 1200 associations in 36 state conventions. Our association is a vital part of this vast mission enterprise.
- 6. The treasurer's report was given by Dr. Wayne Adams and adopted as presented. The total receipts, including the building fund, came to \$103,164,44.
- 7. The 1992-93 proposed budget was presented by Glen Crissman, chairman of the Finance and Budget Committee. The budget totaling \$73,504.92, was adopted as given. The budget included increases for the new training and resource center and the increase in hours for the secretary for 20 to 25 hours per week. Mr. Crissman urged support by the churches to meet the needs as detailed in the budget.

8. Dr. Ray Holland gave the General Board Report, stating that the board dealt

with the homosexuality issue and passed the institutional report.

9. Dr. J. Billy Graham gave the director of missions report. The report focused on missions, evangelism, training, and benevolence. He stated that Southern Baptists needed to give more positive emphasis on our image to the community, and less on the negative. Reminding us of the theme, "Share Heritage and Hope: Equipping Believers," he said that we need to celebrate our rich heritage as Baptists and to stress hope for the future. The association is involved in many types of missions, including partnership with Sao Paulo, Brazil and the new partnership with Long Island Association in New York state. Much energy has been given to completing the new associational building. The association can give more attention to training and equipping our people to serve God better.

10. Rev. Bob Schwartz gave the Missions Department report. He stated that our churches needed to look for needs for ministry with nursing homes, prisons, and other such institutions. His own church has been involved in missions in nursing homes

and prisons for the last eight years.

11. Mrs. Deanna Stockwell, WMU director, and four other members of the WMU council gave the WMU report. It was an interesting and informing report, showing the many kinds of mission involvement of the women in our churches. The dramatic presentation was presented with mock telephones; each council member called the director and reported on some phase of the missions events for the past year.

12. The Brotherhood report was given by Mr. Howard Sherron. He said that many events were conducted by the men and boys during the past year. Training was given

for the men and boys leaders and there were events for the RA's.

13. The director of missions gave a summary of the partnership with Sao Paulo, Brazil, and recognized Mr. Charles English of Red Branch Church and Rev. Bob Schwartz of Beaver Creek Church who were going with him and a team from the Randolph Association to Sao Paulo on October 28; November 10, 1992. Rev. Graham presented Rev. Schwartz with a partnership pin and requested prayer for the team as they prepared to go to Brazil to build a pre-fab chapel and to do missions and evangelism. Rev. Ernest Ferrell led in the commissioning prayer.

14. Mr. Eddie Baggett led in singing the hymn, "So Send I You."

15. We were blessed with the special music, "Lost in Sin" and "Careless Soul," by the choir of the host church.

16. The moderator introduced Miss Peggy Smith, missionary to Brazil on furlough,

who blessed and challenged us with the missionary message. She spoke on the challenge, the need, and the risk. The message was received by the congregation.

17. Pastor Max Gilmore, host pastor, invited everyone to go to the fellowship hall for refreshments. Rev. David Reynolds, pastor of Middle Cross Church, pronounced the benediction and blessing on the refreshments.

October 20, 1992 CAMERON BAPTIST CHURCH AFTERNOON SESSION

- 1. The moderator called the session to order and requested the music director, Eddie Baggett, to lead in singing the hymn, "How Great Thou Art." The pianist was Mrs. Diane Cheek of the host church. Rev. Archie Stevens brought the devotion from Genesis 27 and II Corinthians 2:2,3, emphasized setting the right example in Christian living and encouraged discipleship.
 - 2. Rev. Greg Poplin, host pastor, extended greetings and a cordial welcome to all.
- 3. Rev. Don Ballenger gave the evangelism report. He mentioned several evangelism events which are listed in the printed report.
- 4. The Senior Adult report was given by Mr. Grady Culler. Mr. Culler told of many opportunities for senior adults and encouraged participation in the local and state events.
- 5. Rev. Jim Harris stated that the Sunday School increased by 28 over last year. He reported that the Sunday School rally at Aberdeen was successful. The association was challenged to increase next year by 150.
- 6. Rev. Gary Bodford reported for Discipleship Training. He stated training is being done at times other than just Sunday evening. Make use of the resources available for training.
- 7. Rev. Ed Carroll presented the Youth report, encouraging participation in the youth events of the association and state.
- 8. The Music report was given by Mr. Eddie Baggett. Training in music workshops will help choir directors and musicians be more effective in the local church. Choir directors are encouraged to work closely with the pastor in worship.
- 9. Rev. Joe Clontz, "Care" person and consultant with the Youth and Campus Ministries Department of the Baptist State Convention extended greetings. Rev. Eddie Hammett and Rev. Jerry Richards of the Baptist State Convention shared in the period for Denominational Representatives. Mr. Hammett spoke on the Great Commission that we were to go and make disciples and that we were to abide in Jesus. Mr. Richards shared about military ministries and told of the ministries of chaplains in North Carolina; Scripture was from Matthew 25. More than four million dollars is brought into North Carolina through the military installations. The strength of the military in North Carolina will not be diminished.
- 10. Rev. Robert Wilson led in a fitting memorial service, using Scripture from Exodus 12:14, Acts 10:4, and Mark 14:9. Brother Wilson read the list of 69 of our beloved ones who had gone to be with the Lord, then led in a memorial prayer, and Eddie Baggett led in singing the hymn, "Great Is Thy Faithfulness."
- 11. Mrs. Sandi Brady inspired us with the singing of two hymns, "Stir Thy Church, Lord," and "Do You Really Care?" Rev. Edwin Carroll read the Scripture from John 17:20-22, and Rev. Don Ballenger delivered the annual sermon on the subject of "Unity". Some Scriptures used in the message were: John 17:1, Acts 1, 1 Corin-

thians 12, Ephesians 4, and 1 John 1. The question was asked, "How can a church have unity?" The answer: (1) All members be saved, (2) All be together in prayer, (3) Be under control of the Holy Spirit, and (4) Love one another.

12. Rev. Greg Poplin gave instructions for the supper and offered the prayer of blessing. A delicious meal of ham, potato salad, beans, rolls, and cake was served in the new fellowship hall of the host church.

TUESDAY EVENING SESSION

- 13. The evening session began by singing the new hymn, "Churches in Association," led by Mr. Eddie Baggett. The devotional was given by Mrs. Rev. Carolyn Helms, with Scripture from Matthew 7:24-29. Special music was presented by Mr. Leland Strother: "I Saw the Lord," and "Rise Again". He was accompanied by Mrs. Amy Schuchard Ivey.
- 14. Dr. Ray Holland gave the Building Planning Committee report. The building is debt-free. Only a little work remains to be done before the dedication on November 22, 1992 at 2:30 pm. Now that the work is complete, a motion was made that the building committee be dissolved as of the dedication day. Motion passed. Contributions from the churches will be needed to complete hook-up to the public water and sewer system in the near future. Everyone is invited to the celebration and dedication.
- 15. Mrs. Florence Hardy reported on training for the Library/media ministries and told of the upcoming workshop to be held at the training and resource center on February 27, Saturday morning at 9:30 am. There are many ways that the church can use the library media to promote ministries.
- 16. Mrs. Mary Cockman gave the report on the Committee on Committees which was adopted as presented.
- 17. The Nominating Committee report given by Rev. John Stone was adopted as given.
- 18. Rev. Greg Poplin gave the Stewardship report, reminding the churches that he was available to help with stewardship programs.
- 19. Rev. Mike Ray reported that the ordaining council examined two persons, Mrs. Carolyn Helms from Southern Pines and Mr. Todd Moore of Robbins First, for the gospel ministry.
- 20. The Place and Preacher report was adopted as presented by Rev. Ernest Ferrell. Rev. Ed Carroll will be the preacher for 1993, with Rev. Hayes Ritter as alternate. The places for the 1994 meeting will be held at Faith, October 17, and at Bethlehem, October 18.
- 21. Mrs. Patty Chriscoe gave the Resolutions report, expressing appreciation to the host churches, speakers, musicians, and officers of the association. The report was adopted and will be printed in the minutes.
- 22. The director of missions made the following recognitions: Mr. Erwin Myrick of Pine Grove church had attended all sessions for the last 33 years; Calvin Layton of Taylor Memorial had been attending associational meetings since 1944; Curt Bettini of Southern Pines has attended sessions for the last 30 years and Dewitt Purvis of Calvary for the last 36 years. Appreciation was expressed to Mr. Eddie Baggett for his faithfulness in music leadership for the association, and to Rev. Mike Ray for his continued service for the association. The director of missions promoted the celebration and dedication of the new associational building on November 22, the prayer retreat to be held at Southern Pines on January 30, and the availability of

RA Racer kits. He expressed appreciation for the quality of leadership in our association, including the new ministers of music at Robbins First and Southern Pines First.

23. Mr. Jack Robinson led in the installation of associational officers and the director of missions gave the prayer of dedication.

24. We were blessed with special music by the host choir, directed by Rev. Greg Poplin. Dr. Tom Jenkins, director of the missions division of the Baptist State Convention informed us of some of the mission ministries in North Carolina and challenged us with a message from Revelation 3. A stanza of "When We Walk with the Lord" was played by the pianist in a time of reflection and commitment.

25. The moderator recognized Pastor Greg Poplin who asked Mrs Alma Kelly to stand in recognition for her leadership in preparing and serving the delicious meal. Following the motion to adjourn, Rev. John Stone closed the forty-third session with

a prayer of benediction.





The Associational Executive Committee and Associational Board met three times during the year: January 20, 1992 at Ives Memorial Church; May 18, 1992 at Aberdeen First church; and September 21, 1992 at Carthage First Church.

The meetings were well attended by the officers and board members. Reports were given by the committee chairpersons and board members and other officers of the association.

At the September board meeting a motion was approved to enter a partnership with Long Island Baptist Association in New York in cooperation with the Baptist State Convention and the New York Baptist Convention. On some of the projects, the partnership would be in cooperation with the Randolph Baptist Association.

Moderator Bob Morrison presided at the meetings. Vice-moderator Vivian Green presided at the executive committee meetings.

3. General Board Report

The General Board meetings on January 28-29, May 19-20, and September 29-30, 1992 were held at the Caraway Conference Center.

During the meeting in January we heard reports on the New York Brazil, and Poland Partnerships. Those who gave the reports reminded us of the unique responsibility and privilege we have as North Carolina Baptists to minister through these partnerships. During the September meeting a budget was approved that revealed our continued commitment to world missions.

Perhaps the most difficult task of the General Board in the past several years was to deal with the homosexuality issue. At the May 19-20 meeting, the Rev. Glen Holt, president of the Baptist State Convention read the following recommendation:

The President and the two Vice-Presidents of the Baptist State Convention, the President and the Vice-President of the General Board, and the Executive Director of the Baptist State Convention made the following recommendation to the General Board at their regular meeting, May 19, 1992:

That the Business and Financial Policy of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the General Board be amended by adding to II, 4 a paragraph "a" as follows:

a. No funds of any kind, designated or undesignated, shall be accepted by the Convention, its programs, institutions, or agencies, from any church which knowingly takes, or has taken, any official action which manifests public approval, promotion or blessing of homosexuality. Any such church shall not therefore qualify as a "cooperating church" as defined in article IV, A, 3 of the Constitution of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

This in no way negates the importance of local church autonomy or the Biblical mandate for all Christians to minister to the needs of all people in keeping with the spirit of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Rev. Holt made a motion to approve the resolution. The motion was seconded by Ronald Russell. After much discussion and several failed substitute motions, the original motion was voted on, with 88 ballots 59 Yes, 28 No, and one abstaining.

A typical family being one with a mom and dad plus two or three children. We need an average of 12 hugs per day to be emotionally healthy. We church leaders and members need to be the family to our teenagers and youth, and thus help meet their emotional needs. Each church in the Sandhills Association needs to elect the most capable members to work with their youth, and to reach the youth for our Lord Jesus Chrsit. We must not fail, for our youth are not only the church leaders to tomorrow, they are also a part of the church of today!

X. Historical Events in the Churches

ABERDEEN: Phil Stone from the State Convention was guest speaker for the Sunday School appreciation banquet, October 26. The World Hunger goal was \$2,000. A Campbell University team led activities for youth on November 2-3. The congregation participated in a community Thanksgiving service. The youth sold Christmas trees to raise funds for a youth mission trip to Ocean City, Md. in July. The children's musical on December 11 was "The Real Night Before Christmas." The youth published a cook book to help with funds for the mission project in Maryland. The Keen-agers choir musical was "The Road to Christmas." The adult choir cantata was "Good News of Great Joy." The church conducted weeks of prayer for foreign, home, and state missions. Daryle Cozzens of Pennsylvania spoke at the community youth rally that was sponsored by the youth department. Nine Bradford Pear trees were planted as memorials at the back parking lot. The adult choir sponsored the purchase of new Baptist hymnals. A church pictorial directory was developed in April. The adult choir presented "Crown Him King" in April. The Keen-ager choir presented "Saints Alive" on May 3. A commission service was held on July 5 for the 25 member youth team that went on the mission trip to Ocean City, Maryland, the week of July 11. An antique porch lamp was placed over the front entrance in memory of Margaret Veasey given by her husband, Bob; and a funeral pall was given by family and friends in memory of Mrs. Minnie Kitchin. ASHLEY HEIGHTS: Remodeled sanctuary. (Frances Pickler, Historian)

BETHLEHEM: The past church year was one of spiritual enrichment. It began with a homecoming and a revival. Rev. Paul Nickens brought the messages. Rev. Paul Mull was the minister for the spring revival. The church participated in the Thanksgiving community service. Baptist Men's Day was observed. A church supper helped promote WMU Focus Week. The youth sponsored the Angel Tree for the needy families of our community. To close out 1991 we held a special note Burning service for our fellowship hall. In March we held a Spring revival with Rev. William Tomlinson as our guest preacher. Our VBS was a success in June with an average of 80 per night. Mission work is being carried out in our church by WMU Joy Club. Men's fellowship breakfasts, and our family missions night. Our youth are very active with Kathy Comer directing the youth and their special projects. We had 41 church members to attend Super Summer at Carowinds in July. Our church has been blessed as we have purchased a van to enhance further our work in the church and community. It was not necessary to borrow money. Memorial to Rev. Michael T. Ray



The 1993 Annual is dedicated in loving memory of the life and ministry of the Reverend Michael T. Ray, director of missions for the Sandhills Baptist Association from 1964-1979.

Rev. Ray was born in Kinston, NC on May 31, 1914. He was educated at Campbell College (1939), Furman University (1942) and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary (1948). He was with the US Army during World War II (1942-1945), serving some of that time in India.

While at the seminary in Louisville, KY, he met and married Annelu Moore, a student from Alabama in the WMU Training School (later to become the Carver School of Missions). Mike and Annelu were appointed by the Northern (American) Baptist Convention Foreign Mission Board to serve in India as missionaries. Following a year of study at Cornell University to prepare for service in rural India, and a summer with Wycliffe Bible Society, the Rays moved to India where they served from 1949-1962. The Rays took with them to India their first born, Patricia, and while in missionary service were blessed with the birth of Tommy, Allen, and Katherine.

After service in India, Mike continued his educational pursuits in graduate study at Southeastern Baptist Seminary for one year and another year at the Pastoral Care Department at Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem.

In 1964, Mike was called to serve as the associational Director of Missions for the Sandhills Baptist Association. He and the Ray family moved to Carthage where he began serving as the second Director of Missions for the relatively new association, with an office in the First Baptist Church at Carthage. Rev. Ray served faithfully as director of missions from 1964-1979, ministering with the churches and as chaplain at Sammarkand, helping develop work with some of the prisons in the area, and participating in worthy community projects.

During retirement, Rev. Ray continued his faithful service as a minister of the gospel and a servant of the Lord. He served on several committees for the First Baptist Church at Carthage and in the association, taught the senior adult men's Bible class, worked in Vacation Bible School, assisted with work projects at the church and in the association, and made mission trips to West Virginia and to England. As a deacon and Sunday School teacher in his church at Carthage, Mike was faithful in his ministry of visiting and caring for his family group. Church shut-ins, the sick, and class members.

The Carthage Church and the Association express deep appreciation to God for this dedicated servant of God who lived an unselfish life as a missionary and minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ. It is an honor for us to dedicate this 1993 Annual in loving memory to Mike. It would be Mike's wish that the name of our Lord Jesus Christ be uplifted and glorified.

Constitution

of the

Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

Section 2. The objectives of this association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are elected members of affiliated churches.

- (1) Each church affiliated with this association having a membership up to one hundred members shall be entitled to four messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight messengers.
- (2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff
- (3) Duly elected officers of the association, department directors, chairpersons of all standing committees and the director of missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

- (1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person, upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the association subscribes to *The Baptist Faith and Message* adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.
- (2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watch-care of the association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Associational Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.
- (3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Association Board or the association.
- (4) The association shall be clothed only with the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the association.
- (5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two con-

secutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given, and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall its findings to the association. The association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association but requests a church making such a decision to notify the association in writing of its intention.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The time of the annual meeting shall be Monday and Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. In case of emergency, or for just cause, the Association Board is empowered to change the time or place of the meeting, cancel the annual meeting, or call a special meeting by vote of two-thirds of the members when the vote is taken and giving two weeks' notice, if possible.

Section 3. Voting in the association meetings shall be limited to the duly elected officers and messengers as set forth in Article III, Section 1.

Section 4. A quorum shall consist of messengers from a majority of the affiliated churches.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the association shall be the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, parliamentarian, three trustees, and director of missions.

Section 2. Departments: This association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship through the following departments - Brotherhood, Discipleship Training, Evangelism, Library Services, Missions, Music, Pastoral Ministries, Senior Adults, Stewardship, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, and Youth. The department directors shall be elected by the association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following committees Executive, Committee on Committees, Constitution and Bylaws, Credentials, Finance and Audit, Nominations, Ordination, Place and Preacher, Program, and Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The director of missions and any other employee of the association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject of the authority of the Association Board, and be elected by the Association Board or the association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Foundation, Baptist Hospital, Baptist Retirement Homes, *Biblical Recorder*, and Christian Education.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The association may amend or alter the constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this association shall be governed by the foregoing constitution and the following bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this constitution or its bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the association, all meetings of the Associational Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
 - (b) Shall be ineligible serve more than two consecutive one-year terms.
 - (c) Shall be an ex officio member of all standing committees of the association.
- Section 2. Vice-moderator: Shall preside at the pleasure of the moderator or in the absence of the moderator and shall be the chairperson of the Executive Committee. Section 3. Clerk:
 - (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association.
 - (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the association.
 - (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set forth in the associational budget. Section 4. *Treasurer*:
 - (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
 - (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the association.
- Section 5. *Historian*: Shall collect and put in some durable form information of particular interest about each of the member churches and the association.
- Section 6. Parliamentarian: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.
- Section 7. *Trustees*: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the association; shall handle all legal matters of the association under the direction of the association or Association Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

- (a) Search Committee: The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend to the Associational Board seven members who would serve as a director of missions search committee.
 - (b) Conditions of employment:
 - 1) Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the missionary of the association with a thirty day notice.

- Shall have three weeks vacation with pay; the time will be determined in consultation with Executive Committee.
- 3) May be away from the association for three weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- 4) Will be limited to revivals in the association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
- 5) May serve any church in association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the associational treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
- 6) May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the association.

(c) Duties:

- 1) Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- 2) Shall give general oversight to the work of the association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
- 3) Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.
- 4) Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, associational officers, and general church officers.
- 5) Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
- 6) Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
- 7) Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlisting of more men and boys in the support of the total program of the local church.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 2. Discipleship Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Discipleship Training Program in the churches of the association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 3. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats and rallies.
 - (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 4. Library Services:

- (a) Shall promote library services in the association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audio-visual aid materials and equipment.
 - (b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all churches in the association.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 5. Missions:

- (a) Shall lead the association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.
- (b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the associational mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.
 - (c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.
- (d) Shall select a committee from the association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.
- (e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and make an annual report to the association.

Section 6. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the association.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 7. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
 - (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the AssociationBoard and an annual report to the association.

Section 8. Senior Adult:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of senior adults in the association.
 - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 9. Stewardship:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian stewardship in the association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 10. Sunday School:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School and January Bible Study in the churches of the association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 11. Woman's Missionary Union

- (a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to enlisting of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.
- (c) Shall help in the selecting and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 12. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote youth work in the churches of the association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Associational Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the association.
- (c) The chairpersons of each standing committee of the association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
- (e) The president, vice-president, and secretary of the associational youth council. The Association Board shall act for the association in the interim between its annual sessions. Its duties shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Associational Board contravening the will of the association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the association unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such actions as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the association for final disposition. It shall make full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the association shall be the officers of the Association Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Associational Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than Decembers.

ber 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the associational calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, parliamentarian, director of missions, department directors, chairperson of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and presidents of the associational youth council, and ministers' conference. The vice-moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the director of missions, to devise way and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the association.

Section 3. The Committee of Committees: Shall consist of five members who will nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Shall consist of five members who will present at the annual meeting a list of nominations for associational offices, department directors, Baptist State Convention agency representatives, and as needed, recommend to the Associational Board seven members to serve as a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the association, chosen so as to embrace reasonably the various geographical areas of the association. No member, exclusive of the treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the associational year. It shall be the duty of the committee to draw up and submit the annual associational budget to the Associational Board for approval prior to the presentation at the annual meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the association and make a comprehensive report to the association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: Shall consist of three members who shall plan well the program for the annual meeting. Copies of the program shall be distributed to the messengers and visitors at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Shall consist of the following four members - moderator, vice-moderator, director of missions, and one member at large, who shall serve as chairperson of the committee. This committee shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the association. Its duties shall be to prepare and recommend changes, amendments or additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Shall be composed of three members who shall review all applications from churches for membership in the association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning churches as to doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with a recommendation, shall be submitted to association in annual session or to the Associational Board as provided in Article III, Section 2, of the constitution. This committee may be called upon by the moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2 (5) of the constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: This committee shall consist of a chairperson who is elected by the association and all the pastors in the association. The committee shall examine the candidates who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the gospel

ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for the candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 10. The Committee on Place and Preacher: Shall consist of three members who will recommend in annual session the place or places of the next meeting and the preacher and alternate preacher for the annual sermon.

Section 11. The Committee on Resolutions: Shall consist of three members who will prepare and present to the association suitable resolutions of appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred by the association.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The association may amend or alter the bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of messengers present at an annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment is submitted in writing on the first day of the session for vote on the following day. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the associational newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

V. Proceedings

of the

Forty-fourth Annual Session

FAIRVIEW CHURCH OCTOBER 18, 1993

1. The session was called to order by the moderator, Rev. Bob Morrison, at 7:00 p.m. A total of 150 was present, including 35 visitors. Rev. David Reynolds, pastor, Middle Cross Baptist Church, gave the devotion from Matthew 15:21-27, showing how a need can be met by calling upon God and trusting in Him. The host interim pastor, Rev. Charlie Taylor, extended greetings and welcome from the Fairview church to all messengers and visitors. Mrs. Sandy Ward led in singing the opening hymn, "Serve the Lord with Gladness." Mrs. Ward then led the Robbins Children's choir in singing two songs, "Jaws, Claws, and a Dramatic Pause," and "Get in the Act." Mrs. Cindy Priest was the organist.

2. The Program Committee chairman, Rev. Ed Johnson, moved that the order of service be adopted as printed, and to include any necesarry changes. The motion was adopted.

3. The moderator led in an opening prayer, extended greetings to the messengers and visitors, and recognized Rev. Joe Clontz from the Baptist State Convention. There was no new minister to introduce to the association.

4. Dewitt Purvis presented the Clerk's report, emphasizing the increases in most categories, and stating that the association had great strength in 7,833 members. This strength, by working together, could be compared to the powerful waves in the ocean.

5. Dr. Wayne Adams presented the treasurer's report, which was accepted as given. In the absence of Glen Crissman, Dr. Adams presented the proposed 1993-94 budget, which was adopted as printed.

- 6. Dr. J. Billy Graham gave the director of missions report. He mentioned several programs that the association is involved with during the coming year, and encouraged participation in the partnerships with New York and the Ukraine. Appreciation was expressed for the support of the churches and for the excellent work of the officers. Emmanuel church messengers were recognized and welcomed to the association; Emmanuel church, under watchcare for one year, will be received into full membership at the January Board meeting.
- 7. Rev. Ernest Ferrell gave the Missions Council report, stating that the association is looking forward to the medical dental van and the project to help the needy people, October 23, at Robbins First Baptist Church.
- 8. Mrs. Deanna Stockwell, assisted by several members of the WMU Council, presented an informative WMU report. The WMU is involved in many kinds of mission work and training of missions leaders in the churches.
- 9. Charles English gave the Brotherhood report, encouraging stronger support of the missions work by the men and boys of the association, and threatening to join the WMU.
 - 10. A motion was made and seconded to receive all reports. The motion was adopted.
- 11. Mrs. Sandi Ward led in singing the hymn, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Then, Mrs. Ward led the Associational Ensemble in singing two choral numbers, "This Joy That I Have," and "Come, Follow Jesus."
- 12. Rev. Ed Johnson introduced the speaker, Mrs. Patricia Frazier of Greensboro, who gave an inspiring, informative dramatic monologue on the life of Lottie Moon.
- 13. In the absence of Rev. Willie Bryant, the moderator closed the session with a benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION

- 1. Moderator Bob Morrison called the afternoon session to order at 4:00 p.m. Sandi Ward, music director, led in singing the hymn, "We've Story to Tell the Nations," using the word, "neighbors," in the place of nations in two stanzas. The host pianist was Mrs. Amy Ivey. Rev. Max Gilmore brought the devotion from Isaiah 11:1-5.
- 2. The host pastor, Rev. Sandy Yow, extended a cordial welcome and gave instructions regarding the evening meal.
- 3. Rev. Jesse Mansfield gave the Pastoral Ministries report, encouraging participation of the deacons in the deacon workshop in November; deacons' spouses are invited.
- 4. The evangelism report was given by Rev. Don Ballenger. A major emphasis through 1995 will be the Here's Hope revivals.
- 5. Rev. Jim Harris gave the Sunday School report. He suggested that our churches seek to have a 9.4 percent increase during the coming year.
- 6. Rev. Archie Stevens presented the Discipleship Training report. New Life materials were on display for messengers to examine and consider using in their churches. Church training can be done at anytime a church chooses.
- 7. The youth report was given by Rev. Gary Bodford. Gary emphasized preparation by our churches for the "True Love Waits" campaign. Youth are encouraged to pledge to remain sexually pure until marriage. The association and state convention will conduct rallies during the year. A youth leader workshop will be held on November 8.

- 8. Mrs. Sandi Ward gave the music report. Sandi promoted the development of the associational ensemble, and thanked those who sang with the ensemble at Fairview. She hopes that all 28 churches will support the training made available and have representatives in the associational choir. There will be an associational workshop in April 1994. Interested persons may want to attend the Prism workshop, November 4, 1993, in Greensboro.
- 9. The moderator recognized Mrs. Cathy Hopkins, consultant, Baptist State Convention, who shared the importance of training a child properly, laying a firm foundation for life, using Matthew 10:14. What is learned by age 5 will serve as a foundation throughout life. Rev. Gary Bodford introduced Rev. Hal Melton, director, Youth Ministries, Baptist State Convention, who shared with us about ministries for youth, including the "True Love Waits" campaign. Since the average person gets married about age 26, youth and young adults are challenged to make commitments to be faithfull sexually; the period from ages 13-26 are important years for youth since they face many pressures and temptations.
- 10. Prior to leading the memorial service, Rev. Charles Hinson moved that the association dedicate the 1993 Minutes in loving memory of Rev. Michael T. Ray, former director of missions, for 16 yeas. A tribute to Rev. Ray is to be written by Dr. J. Billy Graham and Dr. Al Martin and placed with a photograph on page 2 of the minute book. The motion was seconded and approved. Then Rev. Hinson led in an inspiring memorial service, giving loving tribute to the memory of 66 beloved ones who departed to be with our Lord during the past year. Following a moment of silence, Rev. - 11. Mrs. Rachel Erbschloe, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Don Ballenger, blessed us with special music in singing, "El Shaddai." Rev. Hayes Ritter, choosing his text from Acts 16:17, delivered the annual sermon, challenging us to be faithful servants, witnessing daily for our Lord.
- 12. The director of missions reminded youth leaders to meet together with Rev. Hal Melton during the meal, and led in a prayer of blessing and benediction.

TUESDAY EVENING SESSION

- 13. Moderator Bob Morrison called the evening session to order at 7:00 p.m. Sandi Ward, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Amy Ivey, led in singing the hymn, "He Keeps Me Singing." Rev. Charlie Taylor, interim pastor, Fairview, brought an inspiring devotion from Romans 12:1-5. A cup and a ruler were used to show how our faith can be measured and applied in service for God.
- 14. Mr. and Mrs. Lelan Strother, members of the host church, blessed us by singing two songs.
- 15. During miscellaneous business the moderator recognized the director of missions who presented a Resolution of Appreciation to the First Baptist Church for providing an office for the association during the past 30 years, 1963-1993. It was moved and seconded to adopt the resolution. The resolution is as follows:

Whereas in 1963, the First Baptist Church of Carthage, North Carolina, extended an invitation to the Sandhills Baptist Association to use a room in the main building of the church as an office for the association, and that this was well suited in space and location, being near a side entrance; and

Whereas, the Carthage First Baptist is centrally located to the churches of the association, making it convenient for accessibility to the churches; and

Whereas, the Carthage First Baptist Church has generously provided this office space, and frequently the use of some other areas of the church facilities for special meetings and other associational use, and assisted with the expenses; and

Whereas, two directors of missions, the Rev. Michael T. Ray, 1963-1979, and Dr. J. Billy Graham, 1979-1993, were able to enjoy the use of the office and to maintain harmonious, beneficial, meaningful relationships with the pastors and members of the congregation; and

Whereas, the association has been able to construct a training and resource center in the Carthage area, and has moved to the center;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Sandhills Baptist Association at its forty-fourth annual session express deep appreciation to the congregation of the First Baptist Church for all the generous support that has been given, and also express gratitude to our heavenly Father for the privilege of working and serving our Lord together in Christian ministries. May our Lord Jesus Lord Christ be honored and the cause of missions be strengthened.

- 16. The director of missions gave the Office Building Report, expressing appreciation to all who had contributed and assisted in any way toward the construction of the associational center. On dedication of the facility in November 1992, the center was debt free.
- 17. Mrs. Florence Hardy gave the Library Media report. Mrs. Hardy stressed the importance of the church library to each church, encouraged the use of the associational library and offered her assistance to any church librarian.
- 18. Mrs. Mary Cockman presented the Committee on Committees report, giving thanks for all the good cooperation and response of each person asked to serve.
- 19. Dr. Bill Walton gave the Nominations Committee report, thanking the committee and those who agreed to serve.
- 20. Rev. Ed Johnson gave the Seminary Extension report, stating that five courses were being offered at the association center, and encouraged our churches to send people to enroll in the classes. The classes have excellent teachers.
- 21. Rev. Charlie Lassiter gave the Place and Preacher report. The association will meet as Ives Memorial church, October 17, 1995, at 7:00 p.m., and at Pine Grove church on October 18, 1995 at 4:00 p.m. The annual sermon will be preached by Rev. Charles Lassiter and the alternate preacher will be Rev. Bill Reynolds.
- 22. Mrs. Margaret Shields gave the Resolutions report, expression appreciation to the host churches and to all who participated in the annual meeting.
- 23. A motion was made and seconded to adopt all of the reports that were presented during the Tuesday sessions, including the election of officers and committee members. The motion was unanimously adopted.

- 24. The director of missions expressed appreciation to all officers and committee members who served faithfully during the past year, and presented a plaque to the moderator for faithful service as moderator from 1991-93.
- 25. Mr. Curt Bettini led in a challenging service of installation of officers for 1993-94, using a variety of tools, to show how we work together in using our skills in God's service. Rev. Tom Barnes led in the prayer of dedication.
- 26. The Ashley Heights Baptist Church choir, led by Mr. Leland Strother, provided special music.
- 27. The moderator introduced Dr. Michael Blackwell, former pastor at Carthage church and president of the Baptist Children's Homes, who brought an inspiring message on the "Ministry of Encouragement," using the Scripture, Acts 13:33-42. Quoting Dr. Norman V. Peale, he stated that we can "knock the T off the Can't" and remember that we can do things with God's help. Dr. Blackwell said that all of us were in need of encouragement, and can be encouragers to each other.
- 28. The closing hymn, "Are Ye Able, Said the Master," was led by Sandi Ward. In the absence of Mr. Vivian Green, newly elected moderator, Rev. Morrison handed over the moderator's gavel to the vice-moderator, Rev. Ed Johnson. The forty-fourth annual session was adjourned with a closing prayer and benediction led by Rev. Ed Johnson.

We were saddened inthe death of our friend and co-laborer in the Lord, former director of missions, Rev. Michael T. Ray, who faithfully served our association for 16 years. Prior to that, he and Annelu were missionaries to India.

Let us rise to the challenge and accomplish great things together for our Lord in 1993-94!


VII. Department Directors' Reports

1. Brotherhood Report



As the director, I attended the State Baptist Men Convention, January 15-17. I then was called upon to bring several messages about the brotherhood to several area churches.

The RA race in February came off very well, thanks to the very patient Jack Robinson and J. Billy Graham. The attendance was very good, and the RAs were advanced to a higher plane by this effort. 3. Evangelism Report

God continues to bless North Carolina Baptist through Evangelism. Plans are continuing to assist our churches in developing Church Evangelism Committees to strengthen the work of evangelism in the church. As of June 1, 1993, Rev. Milton A. Hollifield, Jr. came to serve as our state Evangelism Director. We are currently working to fill two vacant program staff positions in the evangelism division.

Many churches are still getting involved in Total Church Life and WIN schools. The training of the laity to be involved in witnessing will continue to be a priority in North Carolina Baptist evangelism. The Here's Hope Advisory Committee has been named to begin training events in all our associations in preparation for the 1995 Here's Hope Share Jesus Now Revival Emphasis. We have an association Steering Committee in place already to help our churches prepare for this united event to take place in the Spring of 1995. Each church will soon be contacted by a member or the committee.

The 47th Statewide Evangelism Conference was held in Winston-Salem, February 8-9. Dr. W.A. Jones, Dr. Ron Dunn, Dr. Cecil Seagle, Dr. Ralph Smith, Dr. Denton Logz, and Rev. Bobby Sunderland were speakers. Bob and Jan Salley along with Charles Storey, Rick Setzer, and Larry Keesler led the music.

The 1994 State Evangelism Conference will be held February 7-8 at the War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, NC. Final plans for this conference are incomplete at this time, but information will be sent to churches very soon.

Super Summer '93 at Carowinds was held on July 29-30 with over 28,000 youth and adults attending the event. Two celebration services were held with Ike preaching to the group. Music was presented by *WITNESS* and *SAY-SO*. Hundreds of young people made commitments.

Two Youth Evangelism Weeks were held at our North Carolina Baptist Assembly, Caswell, with 2,000 in attendance. Over 300 youth made commitments during these weeks. Our Single Adult Evangelism Conference held in June was well attended by over 300 people. Special conferences were offered for single adults.

Again this year the students evangelism team "WITNESS" served in churches all across North Carolina. Everywhere they ministered, people were blessed. Leading approximately 100 concerts, 12 college/seminary students presented the gospel through exciting and meaningful Christian music.

Regional Evangelism Training Conferences will be held across the state during the month of October. Emphasis for these conferences will be information and training for Here's Hope Share Jesus Now revivals.

Let us continue to work and witness that we may continue to see people come to know Him. It is our prayer that baptisms will begin to rise each year.

5. Missions Report

Sandhills Baptist Association has many wonderful mission opportunities available to us right at our doorstep. Dr. Graham and I have been surveying the area covered by our association to seek new areas of ministry and missions.

Some of the needs that we feel need to be addressed are as follows:

- 1. New work in the way of missions.
- 2. Ministry to the prisons in our area.
- 3. Ministry to rest and nursing homes, retirement center.
- 4. Work with the chaplaincy program of institutions in our area.
- 5. Provide ministry to Hurting Humanity wherever they are.
- 6. Resort Ministry (in the golf communities)

There are two of these areas in which we have made some significant progress. Under the opportunity to minister to Hurting Humanity we have scheduled the NC Baptist Men Medical/Dental Van for October 23, 1993. The event will take place in the parking lot of Robbins First Baptist Church. We will be able to see almost 100 people for medical, dental, and eye problems on this day. There will be trained counselors on the site to witness to the people concerning their need to know Christ in a personal relationship. Those participating will be given medical kits containing some first-aid supplies along with some gospel literature in both English and Spanish. We have been able to staff this van with local doctors, dentists, nurses, dental technicians, and other lay people to help with registration and other incidental things. These people come from Sandhills Baptist Churches as well as other caring people from the community at large.

Another area we are working on addresses the need to minister to the resort area of our association, especially the golfing community. We have been granted a sum of money from the NC Baptist State Missions Offering to get this ministry started. We are planning to bring in an expert in the field of resort ministry to meet with some key people in our association and community to begin to address this need.

6. Music Report

It has been a pleasure to lead the association in the area of music this year. In September, a piano was given to church for fellowship hall by Mrs. Ruth MacFarland as bequeathed in will of Miss MacFarland's sister, Mrs. Thelma Hartshorne. The congregation has been involved in numerous programs of ministry and missions this year, including special weeks of prayer, Bible studies, and children, youth, and adult musicals. (Juanita Lomax, Church Clerk)

BETHLEHEM: The 1992-93 year began with a revival led by Rev. John Stone. We again participated in the community Thanksgiving service. The WMU has continued in their annual mission projects of visiting residents in nursing homes, providing for a child in Foster Care, sending money received from recycling cans to New York, making cheer baskets for shut-ins, and decorating the Christmas tree with socks for the Sandhills Moore Coalition. Also, the WMU purchased items needed for the patients at Dorothea Dix. We had an Easter Sunrise Service at the prayer garden. Afterwards, the young men's class prepared breakfast. Nurses Appreciation Day was observed, recognizing all in the medical profession. Our goal for the special offerings is for each person to participate. We began the campaign for World Hunger, a mile of pennies months in advance, asking for donations to be made weekly. Mrs. Michael Ray taught "With a Servant Heart," at the WMU Spectacular Retreat. The Foreign Mission Study was taught by Dr. Billy Graham who also taught the Home Mission Study at Ephesus which we attended. We were fortunate to have the following missionaries to worship with us and encourage us in missions: Rev. and Mrs. Fred Daniel Callis, Rev. Gary Greene, and Mrs. Virginia Oliver. (Geneva Gordan, Reporter)

CAMERON: This past year has been rewarding for Cameron Baptist Church. It has not been a trouble free year, yet we have sought to see the ministry opportunities in our daily lives as individuals and a church family. Many things are different as far as the buildings and grounds are concerned. We have swings, even for the "big kids," ages 40 and up. Adjacent to the fellowship hall, more than 150 loads of dirt and over 200 feet of pipe and many hours of work from many of the men have been used to prepare for a multi-purpose building. This building will be used to shelter the new 15 passenger van, purchased last year. Also, new lawn equipment and other items for storage will be placed in the proposed building. A new youth center has been developed in the space in the basement of the church; much of the work was done by the youth and the youth leaders. A new piano and keyboard system has been purchased for use in the sanctuary. Computer disks can be used to select pre-recorded music for any occasion. The hearing impaired can benefit from this system. A tape ministry is being organized for the shut-ins. The RAs went on a mission trip to the beach to help build a building for use in worship. The men of the church plan a fishing trip to Ocracoke Island, October 2-9. Forty-three persons went to see "Worthy is the Lamb' on September 18. The church is proud of the pastor in the completion of his doctor of ministry degree, October 22, 1993, from Drew University. It is a big step for pastor; the church will benefit from the advanced education of the pastor.

CALVARY: Our church participated in fall and spring revivals. We averaged 60 percent of our people in the prayer rooms. A new well was dug this year. On Veterans Day, we honored five veterans, and we had one young man present that is still in service. Every year we set aside the fourth Sunday in January for Men's Day, and the fourth Sunday in February for Women's Day, fourth Sunday in March for Youth Day, and the fourth Sunday in April for Grandparent's Day. All of our members participated in these events. This year we started a program on Wednesday night that is very successful; different Bible questions are asked to be answered without looking them up. We have had good discussions and participation. Our pastor, Rev. Bennie Maness, celebrated 57 years in the ministry in August. Our church gave him and his wife a pounding (groceries), and a money tree. Rev. Maness' sermon that Sunday was "He Shall Not Fail." (Isaiah 42:1-4) (Janet Brewer, Clerk)

CARTHAGE: A highlight of Carthage First Baptist Church during the 1992-93 church year was on Sunday, May 9, 1993, with its 135th anniversary observed with a special recognition of this special occasion. The Carthage First Baptist Church was founded on the second Sunday in May 1858, with 22 members and Elder Noah Richardson served as its first pastor. To mark this occasion, three former pastors preached at different times during the four revival nights. The Rev. Charles Mosley of Virginia delivered the homecoming message, Rev. Allen Schuyler of Virginia preached two nights, and Dr. Michael Blackwell of Thomasville, NC was the speaker on the final night. The church also enjoyed a successful Bible School, and a summer youth program directed by youth worker Gina McCarver, who was youth worker here last summer. She graduated from Wake Forest University last spring, and is now at Baptist Seminary in Richmond, Virginia. (Woodrow Wilhoit, Clerk)

EPHESUS: Ephesus Church in its 107th year has carried on all regular programs and added new ones. This is the first year with a Youth Minister, Will Elliot. The children as well as the youth have benefited. We had a missionary to Ghana on furlough speak in December and observed Foreign Mission Week of Prayer with Phyllis Watson teaching the book. The WMU baked cakes for the Carthage Unit of Corrections' Christmas party. A joint Thanksgiving service was held with the Presbyterian and Methodist churches joining Ephesus. IV. Constitution

of the Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

Section 2. The objectives of this association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention in all works of Southern Baptists.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are elected members of affiliated churches.

(1) Each church affiliated with this association having a membership up to one hundred members shall be entitled to four messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight messengers.

(2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid

professional staff.

(3) Duly elected officers of the association, department directors, chairpersons of all standing committees and the director of missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

(1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord will be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership. In this and other doctrinal matters, the association subscribes to *The Baptist Faith and Message* adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.

(2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Association Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Creden-

tials Committee.

- (3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Association Board or the association.
- (4) The Association shall only have the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the association.
 - (5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting,

or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the association. The association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association but requests a church making such a decision to notify its intention in writing to the association.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the association shall be the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, parliamentarian, three trustees, and director of missions.

Section 2. Departments: This association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship through the following departments - Brotherhood, Discipleship Training, Evangelism, Library Services, Missions, Music, Pastoral Ministries, Senior Adults, Stewardship, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, and Youth. The department directors shall be elected by the association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following committees - Executive Committee, Committee on Committees, Constitution and Bylaws, Credentials, Finance and Audit, Nominations, Ordination, Place and Preacher, Program, and Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The director of missions and any other employee of the association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the Association Board, and be elected by the Association Board of the association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Foundation, Baptist Hospital, Baptist Retirement Homes, *Biblical Recorder* and Christian Education.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The association may amend or alter the constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this association shall be governed by the foregoing constitution and the following bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this constitution or its bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. Moderator

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the association, all meetings of the Association Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
 - (b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one year terms.
 - (c) Shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the association.
- Section 2. *Vice-moderator:* Shall preside at the pleasure of the moderator or in the absence of the moderator and shall be the chairperson of the Executive Committee. Section 3. *Clerk*.
 - (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association.
 - (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the association.
 - (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set in the associational budget.

Section 4. Treasurer

- (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
- (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the association.

Section 5. *Historian:* Shall collect information and put in some durable form the items of particular interest about each of the member churches and association.

Section 6. *Parliamentarian:* Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. *Trustees:* Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the association; and shall handle all legal matters of the association under the direction of the association or Association Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

- (a) Search Committee: The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend seven persons to the Associational Board who would serve as a director of missions search committee.
 - (b) Conditions of employment:
 - 1) Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the director of missions or the association with a thirty-day notice.
 - 2) Shall have three weeks vacation with pay; the time will be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.
 - 3) May be away from the association for three weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
 - 4) Will be limited to revivals in the association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.

- 5) May serve any church in the association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the associational treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
- 6) May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the association.

(c) Duties

- 1) Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- 2) Shall give general oversight to the work of the association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
- 3) Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.
- 4) Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, associational officers, and general church officers.
- 5) Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.
- 6) Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
- 7) Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section 1. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlistment of men and boys in support of the total program of the local church.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 2. Discipleship Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Discipleship Training Program in the churches of the association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 3. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.
 - (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.

(c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 4. Library Services:

- (a) Shall promote library services in the association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audiovisual aid materials and equipment.
 - (b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all churches in the association.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 5. Missions:

- (a) Shall lead the association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.
- (b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the association mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.
 - (c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.
- (d) Shall select a committee from the association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.
- (e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and make an annual report to the association.

Section 6. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the association.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to Association Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 7. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
 - (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 8. Senior Adult:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of senior adults in the association.
 - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 9. Stewardship:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian stewardship in the association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 10. Sunday School:

(a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School and Mid-winter Bible Study in the churches of the association.

- (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 11. Woman's Missionary Union:

- (a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlistment of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.
- (c) Shall help in the selection and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate the work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 12. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote youth work in the churches of the association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATION BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Association Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the association.
- (c) The chairpersons of each standing committee of the association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at last two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
 - (e) The president, vice-president, and secretary of the associational youth council.
- (f) The Association Board shall act for the association in the interim between its annual sessions. Its duties shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the association. No action shall be taken by the Association Board contravening the will of the association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such actions as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the association shall be the officers of the Association Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Association Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the associational calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, parliamentarian, director of missions, department directors, chairperson of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and presidents of the associational youth council, and ministers' conference. The vice-moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the director of missions, to devise ways and means,

recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the association.

Section 3. The Committee of Committees: Shall consist of five members who will nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Shall consist of five members who present at the annual meeting a list of nominations for association offices, department directors, Baptist State convention agency representatives, and as needed, recommend to the Association Board seven members to serve as a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the association, chosen so as to embrace reasonably the various geographical areas of the association. No member, exclusive of the treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the associational year. It shall be the duty of the committee to draw up and submit the annual association budget to the Association Board for approval prior to the presentation at the annual meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the association and make a comprehensive report to the association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: Shall consist of three members who shall plan well the program for the annual meeting. Copies of the program shall be distributed to the messengers and visitors at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Shall consist of the following four members - moderator, vice-moderator, director of missions, and one member at large, who shall serve as chairperson of the committee. This committee shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the association. Its duties shall be to prepare and recommend changes, amendments or additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Shall be composed of three members who shall review all applications from churches for membership in the association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning churches as to doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with a recommendation, shall be submitted to association in annual session or to the Association Board as provided in Article III, Section 2, of the constitution. This committee may be called upon by the moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2 (5) of the constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: This committee shall consist of a chair-person who is elected by the association and all the pastors in the association. The committee shall examine the candidates who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for the candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 10. The Committee on Resolutions: Shall consist of three members who will prepare and present to the association suitable resolutions of appreciation and

expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred by the association.

Section 11. The Building and Grounds committee: Shall be composed of five persons. The committee shall inspect the associational properties periodically and assist in maintaining an inventory of equipment, develop and maintain maintenance policies and procedures; develop and recommend an adequate insurance plan to protect all buildings and properties; recommend cost of maintenance care of the property to the budget committee, assist in determining and administering parking space; promote the conservation of energy and other natural resources used in the operation of association properties; and make certain that the grounds are kept clean and in good repair and that trees, shrubs, and grass are healthy, properly nourished and trimmed.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The association may amend or alter the bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of messengers present at an annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment is submitted in writing on the first day of the session for vote on the following day. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the association newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

IV. Proceedings

of the

Forty-fifth Annual Session

FAITH BAPTIST CHURCH OCTOBER 17, 1994

- 1. Registration began with the host church registering messengers and guests at 6:30 p.m. The association music director, Mrs. Sandi Ward, was at the piano for the prelude. Moderator Vivian Green called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Rev. Gene Schuyler gave an challenging devotion from John 6:67,68 on the theme, "Christ, the Only Hope." The host pastor, Rev. Willie Bryant, extended a warm welcome to all, congratulating everyone for being able to find the church which is located two miles inside Harnett County. Rev. Ernest Ferrell led in singing the hymn, "Jesus Saves."
- 2. In the absence of Rev. Bob Schwartz, Program Committee Chairman, Rev. Ernest Ferrell moved that we accept the printed program, subject to any revision, as our agenda for the session. The moderator recognized and greeted all messengers and visitors to the forty-fifth annual session of the association. The director of missions recognized the pastors who came to the association within the last year: Rev. Eugene Ussery, Emmanuel; Rev. Charles Taylor, Fairview; Rev. Eugene Schuyler, Pleasant Hill; Rev. Larry Wells, West End First. Lemon Springs has called a pastor, Rev. Stephen Burrow, who will be on the field, November 27.

Then the director of missions led in a special prayer for Rev. Bennie Maness, pastor at Calvary, who is a patient at Moore Regional Hospital.

- 3. Dr. Wayne Adams presented the annual treasurer's report which was adopted as given. Mr. Curt Bettini presented the proposed budget which had been given to the Associational Board for study and recommended to the association for adoption. The 1994-95 budget of \$76,263.00 was adopted as printed.
- 4. Rev. John Stone, completing the final year of Dr. Ray Holland's term and nominated for a full 4 year term, gave the General Board Report. Pastor Stone reported that he had attended 3 excellent meetings of the State General Board and that he was pleased with the good spirit of cooperation and the direction in ministry that our Board was taking.

5. The director of missions presented his report, expressing his appreciation to all associational officers and leaders for their faithful service, prayer and support from our churches, and shared several highlights of the past associational year.

- 6. The moderator recognized Rev. Bob Morrison, Chairman, Constitution Committee to present an addition of the Building and Grounds Committee to the Constitution. 10. Rev. Ernest Ferrell led in singing the hymn, "Send the Light." We were blessed by the special music, "Three in One," (written by Kenneth) given by Mr. Kenneth Marsh and his sister, Mrs. Robin Ward of Southern Pines First.

11. Rev. Archie Jones, missionary on furlough and in residence with the Baptist State Convention, brought a challenging, informative message on his work in Chile and Ecuador, using the text from Acts 14.

12. For the evening session there were 92 messengers and 25 visitors. The benedic-

tion was given by the host pastor Rev. Willie Bryant.

BETHLEHEM BAPTIST CHURCH OCTOBER 18, 1994

AFTERNOON SESSION

- 1. Ladies from Bethlehem, the host church, began registration at 3:30 p.m. Sandi Ward played the prelude. Moderator Vivian Green called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m. Rev. Ernest Ferrell led in singing the hymn, "The Solid Rock." Rev. Larry Wells brought an inspirational devotion from Joshua 26. Host pastor Rev. Ed Johnson extended a cordial welcome to all and gave instructions about the facilities at Bethlehem.
- 2. Linda Johnson gave the Library Media report, stating that the association was building a library for use by the churches. Linda began serving as associational librarian during the year.
- 3. Rev. Jesse Mansfield presented the Pastoral Ministries report, giving emphasis to equipping deacons for ministry.
- 4. Grady Culler reported that we continue to have good success with Senior Adult ministries. Dates for local and state events are listed in his report.
- 5. In his Sunday School report Rev. Gene Schuyler challenged the churches to build strong Sunday Schools if they desire to have strong churches.
- 6. Rev. Archie Stevens shared with us several things that are available in Discipleship Training and offered himself as a consultant in training for churches who needed his help.
- 7. Rev. Charles Hinson, in the absence of Rev. Gary Bodford, gave the Youth report. There was increased interest and more participation in youth ministries this past year.
- 8. Sandi Ward used a bit of creativity in reporting the exciting things that are happening in church music. Our association attained the Standard of Excellence this past year. The certificate was presented to the director of missions for placing in the associational center.
- 9. The moderator asked that the director of missions recognize guests from the denominations agencies and the convention. Rev. Bruce Rabon, director of public relations, Gardner-Webb University, extended greetings and invited us to the Gardner-

10. The moderator recognized Rev. Bob Morrison who presented the recommended addition of the Building and Grounds Committee to the Constitution and bylaws.

The proposed change was unanimously adopted.

11. Rev. Robert Wilson led in an appropriate memorial service, giving the names of the beloved deceased from the past year and speaking on the word "memorial" from Joshua 4:7, Zachariah 6:14, Exodus 3:14-15, and Acts 10:4. He asked us to remember our brothers and sisters who died last year as people, like we, who "erect our own memorials by the kind of people we are and by our deeds of loving devotion and service." Following a memorial prayer, with Deborah Richardson, Aberdeen First organist, at the piano, Sandi Ward led us in singing "It is Well with my Soul."

- 12. The Aberdeen Keenagers, directed by Mr. Mark Parsons, blessed us with a medley of songs: "His Name is Wonderful," "Precious Name," "Something About that Name," and "Nothing Between." Rev. Bill Reynolds, pastor, Pine Grove church, read the Scripture from Luke 4 and led in prayer in preparation for the excellent message by Rev. Charles Lassister, pastor, Piney Wood church. Rev. Lassister's main points were on the theme "Jesus, the Only Hope,": (1) Jesus Provides Salvation; (2) Jesus Gives Forgiveness for Sins; (3) Jesus Gives Satisfaction to the Believer; and (4) Jesus Gives Security.
- 13. Since there was a few minutes before dinner, Sandi Ward led in singing two hymns. Then Rev. Ed Johnson gave instructions regarding the serving of the meal and offered the blessing. The menu of the delicious meal consisted of baked ham, potatoes, beans, rolls, desserts and drinks.

TUESDAY EVENING SESSION

14. The pianists for the evening session were Mrs. Mary Thompson and Mrs. Paula Hall. Following the prelude, the moderator recognized Rev. Charles Taylor, pastor at Fairview church, who brought an inspiring devotion from John 1 and Matthew 28:18-20. Sandi Ward led in singing the hymn, "The Light of the World is Jesus."

15. The Bethlehem choir, directed by Mrs. Mary Thompson, provided us with up-

lifting special music.

16. The Committee on Committees report, including the nominations for the Building and Grounds Committee, presented by Mr. C.G. Boyte, was adopted as given.

17. In the absence of the chairman, Dr. Bill Walton, Rev. Bill Reynolds, gave the Nominations Committee report, which was adopted as presented.

- 18. Dr. Greg Poplin reported for Stewardship. Dr. Poplin stated that he and Mrs. Poplin were receiving training from the State Stewardship department and would be available to assist churches with stewardship needs.
- 19. Rev. Ed Johnson gave the Seminary Extension report, stating that continuing education opportunities are now available for any of our people in the churches.
- 20. The Place and Preacher report was given by Rev. David Reynolds. The annual sermon will be delivered by Rev. Bill Reynolds, pastor, Pine Grove church, with Rev.

David Reynolds as alternate. The 1996 annual meeting will be held at Emmanuel, October 21, and at Middle Cross on October 22.

21. Rev. John Stone gave the Ordination Committee report. The one minister examined for ordination last year was Mr. Larry Wells, member at Ashley Heights church, who was interim pastor at West End First.

22. Mrs. Mary Cockman gave the Resolutions report, commending the churches for their gracious hospitality, the leaders for faithful service, and the program per-

sonnel for their meaningful contribution to the annual session.


23. The director of missions recognized and commended the following leaders: Sandi Ward, music; Deanna Stockwell, WMU; Charles English, Brotherhood; Grady Culler, Sr. Adults; Rev. Ernest Ferrell, Missions Council; and Gary Bodford, Youth. Recognition was also given to the late Mr. Ray Atkins for his generous assistance in drawing the plans for the associational center. Rev. Joe Clontz, Coordinator with the State Convention Youth and Campus Ministry Department, was recognized for his faithfulness as care minister with our association.

24. Mrs. Anne Graham led in the installation of officers and leaders for 1994-95. Following her inspirational remarks from Col. 3:23, Mrs. Graham distributed hen and chicken plants to each officer and suggested that they consider planting these plants and multiplying their talents in service for Jesus even as the plants grew and multiplied. She offered God's guidance and blessing on them in the dedication prayer.


25. Dr. Charles Page, scheduled to be the closing speaker on the "Here's Hope" theme, was unable to attend due to sickness. The evangelism chairman, Rev. Don Ballenger, and the director of missions, Dr. J. Billy Graham, were the closing speakers. Rev. 3. Director of Missions Report

We have enjoyed another good year in associational missions. We are pleased to welcome the following pastors and their families to our association: Rev. Eugene Ussery, Emmanuel; Rev. Charlie Taylor, Fairview; Rev. Gene Schuyler, Pleasant Hill; and Rev. Larry Wells, West End. And Lemon Springs church is voting on a pastor Sunday, October 15.

In July I had the privilege of going on a mission trip for eight days to Buffalo, New York with 77 youth and adults from three of our churches, Aberdeen, Robbins, and Southern Pines. This mission team had made excellent preparation. In New York the youth presented a musical several times in churches and parks. Through drama, puppets, recreation and music the team conducted effective Bible studies with the small Southern Baptist churches, in backyard settings and in the park. We feel that the Christian work in Buffalo has been greatly strengthened. In September our Brotherhood director, Charles English, was the team leader for a small mission construction group that went to Brazil to construct a chapel.

We have tried to be effective in ministry with the "Hope for Hurting Humanity" emphasis in our convention. Churches were encouraged to seek to determine if there were unmet needs in their communities and to develop ways of ministering to people with special needs. In the fall and spring, the association joined with our sister churches in sponsoring the State Baptist Convention Medical Dental Van Unit. The host church for the van was Robbins First. Southern Pines First is the host church for October, 1994. Many needy families received medical and dental assistance without cost through this ministry. We appreciate and commend all the volunteers who gave of their time and skills in this special ministry. Several churches, including groups from Southern Pines, Robbins, Vass, Carthage, Ephesus, and Victory, assisted with the booth in September during the Moore County Fair in September. At the booth we distributed tracts on evangelism, the Baptist faith, hunger, drug abuse, and marriage and the family. A Christian witness and a cup of cool water were served in Jesus' Name. Thanks to all who helped with these important ministries!

All our departments held workshops this past year. Some departments conducted several meaningful events. We appreciate our officers and leaders who give of their ability and time to lead in so many meaningful ways. Several conferences were held at our new Resource Center. We are grateful that we were finally able to connect

with the Town of Carthage water and sewer system!

I continue to try to keep up with these changing times and to sharpen my skills so that I can serve our churches better. I have been able to attend the state and national conventions, a Sunday School Board Update in Nashville, Home Missions Week at Ridgecrest, and two seminars for associational directors of missions. Anne and I are taking a Spanish course at Sandhills College so that we can better communicate with the Hispanics in our area. Anne and I continue to make ourselves available for mission studies, retreats and Bible studies.

I am working with our missions leaders in seeking to initiate, develop, and nurture new work in places where it is needed. We are seeking to reach more people through evangelism this year than ever before. Our evangelism steering committee will be guiding us in preparation for the big "Here's Hope: Jesus Cares For You" Crusades in 1995. Our suggested dates are April 2-9. We hope that every church will experience a great harvest of souls.

Once again in cooperation with Pee Dee Association, we are making preparation

for a World Missions Conference. We will have the privilege of having 5 missionaries in each participating church from Sunday, October 29 - November 1, 1995. Each church will be given opportunity to participate. We look forward to a good year in the Lord in 1994-95!

1. Brotherhood Report

3. Evangelism Report

The 48th State Evangelism Conference was held at War Memorial Auditorium in Greensboro.

The State Evangelism Conference will be held at Calvary Baptist Church in Winston-

Salem, February 6-7, 1995.

The summer of 1994 was packed with exciting, fun, inspirational and evangelistic weeks at Fort Caswell; we had 2,100 in attendance and recorded 159 professions of faith. SUPER SUMMER '94 at Carowinds theme park resulted in a record breaking attendance in excess of 31,000. Worship celebrations were held each evening with music, testimony and preaching. More than 233 professions of faith were recorded.

The Summer Student Evangelism Team (WITNESS) presented concerts during four conferences at Caswell and forty additional concerts in associations and churches. They also ministered during two evangelism events at Rockingham and Charlotte

Motor Speedways in the fall.

Sixteen Regional Evangelism Conferences were held across the state in October of this year. We are planning to add some new statewide conferences for lay people in 1995.

The major emphasis for 1994-95 will be the "Here's Hope" revivals. Our association's schedule for preparation is as follows:

- 1. How to Share Your Faith Clinic, October 10, 6:30-9:00 p.m. at the Association Center, led by Rev. Larry McElreath, Evangelism Division, NC Baptist Convention.

The emphasis this year is on witnessing with the introduction of new materials for improving media/libraries. Among the new items introduced were *Preparing Print Media for Circulation*, BBS Catalog item #5120-02, \$6.95, *Preparing Audiovisuals for Circulation*, BBS Catalog item #5120-09, \$5.95, *Church Media Library Administration*, BBS Catalog item #5120-03, \$6.95, *Using the Dewey Decimal Classification System*, BBS Catalog item #5120-04, \$5.95, *Using Sears Subject Headings, Care and Repair of Books*, BBS Catalog item #5120-05, \$6.95, *Selecting Media*, BBS Catalog item #5120-08, *Space, Furnishings and Interior Design*, BBS Catalog item #5120-10, \$5.95, and *Audiovisual Hardware*, BBS Catalog item #5120-11, \$5.95. In addition, the *Master Library System* for use on computers was announced for Pastors and small churches.

Our local Key Leadership session was held at Carthage First Baptist, August 29. The above information was shared with those attending and ideas were shared about how to improve our libraries.

Media Ministry is an important part of every church's equipping ministry in helping Christians to become all that God wants them to be: His witnesses.

4. Hurting humanity. There are many hurting people in several areas of Moore, Lee, Hoke and Harnett Counties. The convention has a promotion now urging churches and associations to reach out to meet these needs.

6. Music Report

For 1993-94, Sandhills Association received the Standard Certificate of Achievement in church music. This award is based on meeting certain basic criteria: i.e., holding choir events, offering training opportunities, establishing a music council and a network for communication—which through working together, we accomplished. Of our 28 Sandhills churches, 19 have participated in the music program in one way or another this year. Thank you for your growing enthusiasm and support. This certificate is yours and is located at the Association Office.

The new year began with the formation of an associational choir. The choir practiced basically once a month and presented special music at two association events: the annual meeting at Fairview and the ChoirSing held at Bethlehem in May. Because of these positive first-year experiences, the group has agreed to continue meeting and looking for opportunities to sing. We invite all choir members, directors,

and accompanists to join us.

A more effective communication network was attempted this year with the setting up of a Music Council. The association has been divided into seven areas. One music director from each area is responsible for contacting the churches in that area about upcoming events. Area directors were decided at the Key Leadership meeting at Carthage in August. You will be hearing from them.

Our annual music workshop was held in April, with Neal Eller once again leading us in a joyful mass choir rehearsal and mini worship experience. Despite a lower attendance, the experience was very rewarding for all who participated; we will continue to offer workshops each year as long as our churches express a need—please encourage your church to come. We were extremely fortunate to have these seminary-trained instructors to teach our courses and thus making most of them transferable to *selected* colleges and/or seminaries. We offered a total of five courses last fall and unfortunately the response was not very good. We had only two people sign up.

These courses are still available to be taught for lay persons and pastors who want to sharpen their skills in ministry. If you are interested, please let the Association Office know what you are interested in and when we get enough people together to form a class we will gladly provide an instructor and set up a time. Better still, get together with some of your friends and fellow pastors and form a class on your own. We will furnish the instructor. Just let us know what it is you want to study. Whatever you need there is a Seminary Extension Course for you.

In addition to classroom courses, Seminary Extension Courses are available for home study. The scriptures tell us to "Study to show thyself approved." An informed ministry is a strong ministry with a solid foundation. See our Seminary Extension representative today. More information may be obtained by calling the Association office at 947-2238 or Rev. Ed Johnson at 947-1686.

X. Historical Events in the Churches

ABERDEEN: Mr. Mark L. Parsons unanimously was voted to become Minister of Music. The church had a top ten favorite hymn survey. The selected hymns were used in worship from September 12 to November 14. The number one hymn was "Amazing Grace." Janice Bodford led a 12 session study on "How to Manage Your Money." Many church members volunteered to assist with the food closet. In February the Wingate College Choir sang at the morning worship service. The Youth Creative Ministries Team from Cary First presented a program of music, puppets, clowns and drama on March 6. A brass cross was given to the church for use over the baptistry by Virginia Williamsons' family and friends in loving memory of Garland Williamson. The church approved a proposal to renovate the kitchen and fellowship hall; the project was completed and dedicated in loving memory of James W. Selby on September 11. Some men of the church inititated a visitation program. The church library was renovated in May. The highlight of the year was the celebration of the 100th year anniversary of the congregation. At the kickoff dinner on January 9, Rev. Paul Nickens gave the devotion. The centennial logo was "1894-1994 Bound Together in service." During the Sundays in May the following ministers spoke at the morning service: Dr. Eugene Deese, Dr. R. Denny Spear, Dr. Gwen McCormick, Rev. Herman Russell, Jr. and Dr. Roy Smith of the Baptist State Convention. The youth were involved in several projects, including a mission trip to Buffalo, NY. On September 4, Deborah Richardson, Secretary and Organist, was honored with a gift for her 17 years of faithful service. (Yuanita R. Lomax, Clerk)

BETHLEHEM: Our 1993-94 church year began with a fall revival led by Rev. Ernest Ferrell from First Baptist Church Robbins. We participated in the community Thanksgiving service at Doubs Chapel Methodist with Fairview Baptist, and Culdee Presbyterian, with our choir providing the special music. Some of the WMU projects included providing for a foster child from Social Services, sending money by recycling cans to a New York church, making cheer baskets for sick and shut-ins, and decorating a Christmas tree with socks that were given to the Seven Lakes Nursing after Christmas. We also made stuffed bears for the Medical/Dental van in Robbins. We had sunrise Easter service with the Young Men's class preparing breakfast for everyone. We observed Foreign and Home Missions Studies. We were host for the Associational Choir Festival in May which was a huge success. We are excited about the completion of our enlarged fellowship hall and new kitchen which will be used for the first time when the Association meets in our church for the annual meeting October 18, 1994. (Ann Dowd, Historian)

BEULAH HILL: The church incorporated and voted on a new constitution. Our sanctuary was completely renovated and the Sunday School classrooms were painted. The church continued on with our mission work in such areas as the nursing homes, backyard Bible club and the West Virginia mission trip, all of which were very successful. Other events in our church life included: Harvest festival, Hanging of the Greens, Christmas program, Watchnight service, Sunrise service, V.B.S. and two revivals. Thanks goes to our Almighty God for the success of all the programs, projects and events of the past year. (Gail Booth, Historian)

CAMERON: This year we baptized 22 people. We observed Baptist men and Baptist Women's day with the men singing in the choir on men's day and women singing in the choir on women's day. The men and women also assisted in the pulpit on special days. The deacons honored their wives with a "Sweetheart" banquet. Rev. Womack Keck preached the Spring revival. Cameron church jointly shared the Thanksgiving service with the churches in the community. The Easter sunrise service was held in the cemetery, followed by breakfast at the church. Several men and women of the church went to see the drama, "Worthy is the Lamb." The youth were involved with several meaningful projects, including "True Love Waits." The church is completing the renovation of the educational rooms and the sanctuary. The renovation includes two restrooms, a new pastor's study, a new nursery, and new windows in the educational area. The men formed a basketball team and played some other teams in the association.

CALVARY: In April, Arthur Brewer started Midw, a Tract Ministry with the support of the church. In June, we had a new parking lot constructed, headed by Tim McNeill. Junior Brown fixed the church bell, which had not rung in years.

Also in June, the church record books were microfilmed to protect our church history. A new church directory was published this past year. (Janet Brewer, Clerk)

CARTHAGE: The church put on a new roof on the sanctuary and educational building and installed a new air conditioner unit for the educational building. A summer Youth Corps worker served with the youth for ten weeks. The youth were involved in several projects, including going to see "Worthy is the Lamb," and to Caswell and participating in the "True Love Waits" campaign. Five Acteens went to Mundo Vista. Church records were microfilmed by the Historical Society at Wake Forest University Library. During the year the pastor was able to construct his own home; the parsonage will be rented. Rev. James Cammack led in the Spring revival. (Woodrow Wilhoit, Clerk)

EPHESUS: As Ephesus Church moves into the 109th year, we are thankful for attaining increased mission goals as well as over-subscribing our budget. The Homebound Ministry has taken the Sunday School lesson to eight homes each week. Also through the Sunday School, a weekly visitation and contact program has resulted in unchurched homes as well as members begin visited. The music ministry has included three choirs with cantatas at Christmas and Easter, and participation in the Associational Choir. Our young people have been active under the direction of a part-time director from Campbell University. The church supported the director on a mission trip to Beliese in December. The youth went on a retreat to the mountains in January, Super Summer at Carowinds, a summer retreat to Mars Hill, and a week at Caswell. They also participated in the True Love Waits Campaign. The WMU met the Distinguished rating for the sixth year. The organization led the church in observing the Weeks of Prayer, observed a Prayer Retreat in January and Baptist Women's Day in February, On that day, Gloria Grogran, Director of WMU in the District of Columbia, spoke of her work, followed by a fellowship meal. A food pantry was established through the leadership of WMU. The Acteens had luminaries at Christmas, and a lock-in for the Association during the year. The brotherhood holds breakfast once a month and prepared breakfast for the community Sunrise Service at Easter, also a Valentine meal for the ladies. Bible School in June was the most successful in history with 154 enrolled. The church subscribes to Mandate; and the last Wednesday in the month, the mission films keep the members informed of the denomination work. Under the leadership of the Morrisons, the church has gone forward and is looking forward to the new year with visions of new goals. (Bernice Briggs, Historian)

EMMANUEL: The church paid for all expenses to send one of our members, Rodney Edmonds, on a ten day mission trip with Charles English Ministries to Brazil to help conduct a church building. There has been a new sign erected in front of the church and new doors installed on the front of the church. (Vallie Mae Marsh, Clerk)

FAIRVIEW: The church voted to call Rev. Charles Taylor as pastor. In preparation for his move, the parsonage was repainted and other necessary work was done. Sunday School rooms were repainted, new blinds were installed, and a pastor's study was prepared for Rev. Taylor.

IVES MEMORIAL: During the past year the church participated in fall and spring revivals, foreign and home mission studies, and conducted a Vacation Bible

School. We held a Maundy Thursday service in cooperation with our sister community church, the Pinebluff United Methodist Church. We had a special candle-light service for Christmas and watch night, and enjoyed a sweetheart banquet in February. Rev. James Daves, former pastor, was our homecoming speaker in May. On July 24, we celebrated a note burning service with another former pastor, Rev. Lee Proctor, who served our church when the new sanctuary was constructed. We had numerous youth events during the year. (John Carpenter, Historian)

LEMON SPRINGS: The congregation has been praying and searching for a pastor this year, following the retirement of Rev. Tom Barnes who served the church

faithfully for 15 years.

MIDDLE CROSS: Our youth leaders collected 200 pounds of food for the coalition and received money and food for families in need in our community at Thanksgiving. On December 5, we began our children's church for ages 3-9, held during the worship hour. Children from the youngest to the oldest took us on a tour of Bethlehem Market Place. It was truly a blessing, Middle Cross has Baptist Hymnals, Bibles for congregational use, and special music for the choir. We raised money to help build a church in India and raised money for Bibles to be given away in Russia. Twenty persons made professions of faith in a wonderful Bible School. On our first "Old Fashioned Day," May 29, we played games, enjoyed hot dogs, hamburgers, and homemade ice cream. Dr. Billy Graham led in the dedication of our new Sunday School rooms. Here is a year round garden each church and individual should have: (1) 5 rows of peas: Prayer, Promptness, Politeness, Perserverence, and Purity; (2) 3 rows of squash: squash gossip, fault finding, and indifference; (3) 5 rows of lettuce: Let us be faithful, unselfish, truthful, love one another, and follow Christ; (4) Finally, no garden is complete without turnips: Turn up for church with a smile, with an open heart to receive blessings, to make everything count for something good. May God bless you. (Leona Thomas, Historian)

NEW HOME: The church continues to grow. The congregation has been enjoying much progress under Rev. Jimmy Phillips' leadership. Tables and chairs have been placed in the fellowship hall for more Sunday School class rooms. Due to increased attendance, the adult class was divided into 3 classes: young adults, middle adults, and senior adults. A new swing set was placed on the church

We had our church records put on microfilm, and purchased a fire-proof safe for church records. We contributed \$1,000.00 to Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem. We bought a new riding lawn mower for the church. We

thank the Lord that our church is growing in numbers and that the Lord's spirit is in our church. We have a wonderful pastor. (Shirley Lassiter, Clerk)

RED BRANCH: After many years of praying, planning, preparing, fund-raising, the congregation built and dedicated a beautiful new sanctuary. The church continues to be involved in missions and evangelism. A member, Charles English, went on 2 mission trips to Brazil to help build new chapels. Frank Muse, a member, is involved in inter-faith ministries, particularly helping Christians be aware of the Jehovah Witness and Morman cults.

ROBBINS: This has been another year of excitement in God's work in First Baptist of Robbins. We have embarked on a local outreach ministry in order to touch lives that need Christ but aren't being reached by organized churches here. We began our year with a dinner honoring town officials and support groups, and are starting next year with a similar free meal. In between, we have helped with the local area Christian Ministry outreach organization, sponsored the bloodmobile, a return engagement of the Baptist Medical/Dental Van, and helped several of our own members with pressing personal needs. We've held two outdoor community crusades and one area-wide indoor one, all featuring outstanding music and great preaching. Our own services have ben heightened and brightened with music, with three cantatas playing to packed audiences, and one of which found its way "On the Road" with our youth's mission trip to New York in July! We have been promised more to come from the music drama department! The Grand Finale of our year was the huge homecoming in late September, which drew nearly 100 guests, and really surprised a former pastor with "Honor C. Gene Booker Day!" Stay tuned! God is just starting with us! (Hariette Loy, Historian)

SOUTHERN PINES: First Baptist, Southern Pines, approved a new ministry in business session in August and hope to have it activated by year's end. A committee was formed to create policies and procedures of screening, supervisions and management in using the church's two garage apartments on Ashe Street as emergency shelters for needy people. Included will be relocated families needing a place to stay until the first pay check from new employment; families or individuals made homeless because of crisis or emergency; and out-of-staters who have relatives hospitalized at Moore Regional. An exciting happening was the Youth Mission Trip to Buffalo, NY in the summer attended by 24 youth and six adults. The group held Bible school for 26 children at Calvary Christ Church and presented the musical, "Celebrate Life" in area parks as well as local

churches. Rev. John Stone preached and the Sanctuary Choir sang at the sanctuary dedication of Victory Baptist Church which was the recipient of pews and stained glass windows from our former sanctuary. The choir sang at the community service for Martin Luther King day in January and at the Associational Choir sing at Bethlehem Baptist. We hosted a youth choir from Forsythe, GA in June. Our senior citizens continue their ministry, "Hee Haw" and are in great demand for performances. The Senior Adult retreat was a trip to Blennerhassett Island in West Virginia in May. Our staff has mastered computers which were installed at mid-year. (Cos Barnes, Historian)

TAYLOR MEMORIAL: Work on the fellowship hall/educational building is continuing with good progress. We had a joint Thanksgiving service with the Roseland Methodist Church. The children have given over \$125.00 to the Children's Home by bringing their pennies to the Children's sermon. Five youth and two leaders went to Centrifuge at Ridgecrest in July. (Beulah Hartsell, Clerk)

Members are participating in a project "Read the Bible through this year." A TV, VCR, and Bible video library was purchased. 

IV. Constitution

of the

Sandhills Baptist Association

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this body shall be "The Sandhills Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES AND OBJECTIVES

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are members of duly elected affiliated churches.

Section 2. The objectives of this association shall be to promote fellowship, missions, associations, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention in all work of Southern Baptists.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP AND AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Sandhills Baptist Association shall consist of messengers who are elected members of affiliated churches.

- (1) Each church affiliated with this association having a membership up to one hundred members shall be entitled to four messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members or major fraction thereof, thereafter. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than eight messengers.
- (2) Pastors of the affiliated churches and their missions and other full-time paid professional staff.
- (3) Duly elected officers of the association, department directors, chairpersons of all standing committees and the director of missions.

Section 2. Affiliations:

- (1) The churches affiliated with this association shall be churches who use the New Testament as a statement of faith and church policy, and who teach that a person upon profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord will be immersed in water, unless providentially hindered, to qualify for church membership; In this and other doctrinal matters, the association subscribes to *The Baptist Faith and Message* adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, May 9, 1963.
- (2) Churches shall be received into this fellowship only after having been under watchcare of the association for one full year. Application for membership shall be made through the Credentials Committee. The Association Board shall have the authority to receive any church under watchcare upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee.
- (3) Baptist churches affiliated with and in fellowship with other Baptist associations may become affiliated with the association without coming under the watchcare, upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and the approval of the Association Board or the association.
- (4) The Association shall only have the authority to advise the churches touching all things pertaining to their interest, but shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal policy. The association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church. Each church shall recognize the complete autonomy of the association.

(5) Whenever a church fails to be represented by letter at the annual meeting, or fails to show interest by financial support and attendance at associational meetings for two consecutive years, or reportedly violates Section 2, (1) of this article, the moderator shall ask the Credentials Committee to confer with the church. If satisfactory reason is not given and there is not effort to keep alive their association with the cooperating churches, the Credentials Committee shall bring its findings to the association. The association, by majority vote of its messengers casting ballots, may then withdraw its fellowship. The association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the association but requests a church making such a decision to notify its intention in writing to the association.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the association shall be the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, parliamentarian, three trustees, and director of missions.

Section 2. Departments: This association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship through the following departments - Brotherhood, Discipleship Training, Evangelism, Library Services, Missions, Music, Pastoral Ministries, Senior Adults, Stewardship, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, and Youth. The department directors shall be elected by the association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board.

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following committees - Executive Committee, Committee on Committees, Constitution and Bylaws, Credentials, Finance and Audit, Nominations, Ordination, Place and Preacher, Program, and Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The director of missions and any other employee of the association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the Association Board, and be elected by the Association Board or the association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Foundation, Baptist Hospital, Baptist Retirement Homes, *Biblical Recorder*, and Christian Education.

ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the Association shall be the *Moderator*, *Vice-Moderator*, *Clerk*, *Treasurer*, *Historian*, *Parliamentarian*, *three* (3) *Trustees*, *and Director of Missions*.

Section 2. Departments: This Association shall promote an aggressive program of teaching, training, evangelism, missions, and stewardship emphasis through the following departments: Sunday School, Church Training, Youth, Brotherhood, Music, Evangelism, Stewardship, Library Services, Woman's Missionary Union, Missions, and Senior Citizens. The department directors shall be elected by the Association in annual session. Vacancies occurring between annual sessions shall be filled by the Associational Board.

Section 3. Associational Board

Section 4. Committees: There shall be the following standing committees - (1) Executive, (2) Committee on Committees, (3) Nominating, (4) Finance and Audit, (5) Program, (6) Constitution and Bylaws, (7) Credentials, (8) Ordinations, (9) Place and Preacher, (10) Resolutions.

Section 5. Employees: The Director of Missions and any other employees of the Association shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program, subject to the authority of the Associational Board, and be elected by the Associational Board or the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. Representatives: (1) Baptist Hospital, (2) Children's Homes, (3) Homes for the Aging, (4) Christian Education, (5) *Biblical Recorder*, and (6) Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VI - REVISION

The association may amend or alter the constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at the annual meeting, provided that each proposed change or amendment be stated in writing on the first day of the session and be voted on the day following. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the Sandhills Baptist newsletter in the last issue before the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The associational year shall begin on the first day of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

The work of this association shall be governed by the foregoing constitution and the following bylaws.

Bylaws

ARTICLE I - PROCEDURES

The business of the association shall be conducted according to the latest edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* where not otherwise specified by this constitution or its bylaws.

ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section I. Moderator

- (a) Shall preside over the annual sessions of the association, all meetings of the Association Board, and see that order and decorum are observed.
 - (b) Shall be ineligible to serve more than two consecutive one year terms.
 - (c) Shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees of the association.

Section 2. Vice-moderator: Shall preside at the pleasure of the moderator or in the absence of the moderator and shall be the chairperson of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. Clerk.

- (a) Shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association.
- (b) Shall superintend the printing and distribution of the associational minutes.
- (c) Shall keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the association.
 - (d) Shall be paid an annual amount as set in the associational budget.

Section 4. Treasurer.

- (a) Shall be responsible for the receipt and distribution of all monies.
- (b) Shall keep an accurate record of both receipts and distributions.
- (c) Shall make comprehensive reports to the Associational Board at its regularly scheduled meetings and to the annual meeting of the association.

Section 5. Historian: Shall collect information and put in some durable form the items of particular interest about each of the member churches and association.

Section 6. Parliamentarian: Shall advise and assist the presiding officer of the association and the Associational Board with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. Trustees: Shall hold in trust any property, money endowed, or other securities of the association; and shall handle all legal matters of the association under the direction of the association or Association Board.

Section 8. Director of Missions:

- (a) Search Committee: The Nominating Committee, as needed, shall recommend seven persons to the Associational Board who would serve as a director of missions search committee.
 - (b) Conditions of employment:
 - 1) Shall be called on an indefinite basis. The relationship may be terminated by either the director of missions or the association with a thirty day notice.
 - 2) Shall have three weeks vacation with pay; the time will be determined in consultation with the Executive Committee.
 - 3) May be away from the association for three weeks for revivals and/or World Missions Conferences. These meetings will be scheduled in consultation with the Executive Committee.
 - 4) Will be limited to revivals in the association only so far as they do not conflict with basic responsibilities.
 - 5) May serve any church in the association as interim pastor for a period not to exceed five Sundays, except when additional time is approved by the Executive Committee. At such a time, the church should contribute to the associational treasurer a reasonable remuneration for services.
 - 6) May serve as chaplain in one institution outside the association, but this work shall not unduly interfere with the responsibilities to the association.

(c) Duties

- 1) Shall respond within the limits of time and ability to the invitations of the churches for assistance in their congregational needs; work with associational leaders in planning and initiating a program of work; encourage the cooperation of all the churches in the undertakings of the association; promote missionary interest among the churches; enlist the churches in the support of those causes fostered by the Baptist State Convention.
- 2) Shall give general oversight to the work of the association and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, draw up an annual calendar of activities which shall be approved by the Associational Board.
- 3) Shall give written quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.
- 4) Shall publish an attractive and informative newsletter and shall distribute it to pastors, Associational Board members, associational officers, and general church officers.
- 5) Shall cultivate the friendship and goodwill of those churches not fully cooperating with the association in the hope that they may be led to cooperate with us in carrying out the Great Commission.

- 6) Shall be alert to the needs of mission work in unchurched areas and shall conduct surveys, when deemed advisable, to ascertain these needs. When mission work is established, he shall see that it is initiated under the sponsorship of a local affiliated church.
- 7) Shall be an ex officio member of standing committees of the association.

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS

Section I. Brotherhood:

- (a) Shall promote the total Brotherhood program (Baptist Men and Royal Ambassadors) in the churches of the association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlistment of men and boys in support of the total program of the local church.
 - (c) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 2. Discipleship Training:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote the Discipleship Training Program in the churches of the association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders for each department.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 3. Evangelism:

- (a) Shall promote and encourage evangelism in the association through clinics, lay evangelism schools, retreats, and rallies.
 - (b) Shall appoint a committee to assist in this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 4. Library Services:

- (a) Shall promote library services in the association through conferences and workshops, encouraging the churches to establish libraries with adequate books, audio-visual aid materials and equipment.
 - (b) Shall provide assistance, when requested, to all churches in the association.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 5. Missions:

- (a) Shall lead the association in identifying and evaluating its mission needs and in planning and conducting its mission programs.
- (b) Shall help the churches commit themselves to the association mission program and to one another for accomplishing their work.
 - (c) Shall work with the missions committees of the churches.
- (d) Shall select a committee from the association to give proper representation and perspective in helping perform the duties of this office.
- (e) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and make an annual report to the association.

Section 6. Music:

- (a) Shall seek to stimulate interest in good church music through workshops, music schools, and hymn sings in the member churches and in association-wide efforts.
- (b) Shall plan with proper associational leaders and direct the music at all meetings of the association.

- (c) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to discharge this responsibility.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to Association Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 7. Pastoral Ministries:

- (a) Shall assist the churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministries, vocational guidance, church administration services, and church weekday education.
 - (b) Shall select personnel necessary to conduct this ministry.
- (c) Shall make regular reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the arterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 8. Senior Adult:

- (a) Shall identify needs, promote programs, and utilize resources of senior adults in the association.
 - (b) Shall select and enlist personnel necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 9. Stewardship:

- (a) Shall encourage Christian stewardship in the association through conferences, seminars, clinics, and stewardship revivals.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry on this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 10. Sunday School:

- (a) Shall study and seek to promote Sunday School, Vacation Bible School and Midwinter Bible Study in the churches of the association.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint personnel necessary to carry out this task.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section II. Woman's Missionary Union:

- (a) Shall promote the total Woman's Missionary Union program (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) in churches of the association through workshops, retreats, and rallies.
- (b) Shall give special emphasis to the enlistment of women, young women and girls in the support of the total program of the church.
- (c) Shall help in the selection and appointment of leaders necessary to facilitate the work.
- (d) Shall make quarterly reports to the Associational Board and an annual report to the association.

Section 12. Youth:

- (a) Shall seek to promote youth work in the churches of the association through council meetings, rallies, and retreats.
 - (b) Shall select and appoint leaders necessary to facilitate this work.
- (c) Shall make quarterly reports to the Association Board and an annual report to the association.

ARTICLE IV - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF THE ASSOCIATION BOARD AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Association Board:

- (a) The active pastors of member churches and missions.
- (b) The officers of the association.
- (c) The chairpersons of each standing committee of the association.
- (d) Three members elected by each church with the request that at least two members are, or have been, officers or elected leaders of that church.
 - (e) The president, vice-president, and secretary of the associational youth council.
- (f) The Association Board shall act for the association in the interim between its annual sessions. Its duties shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the association. No action shall be taken by the Association Board contravening the will of the association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency, it may take such actions as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. The officers of the association shall be the officers of the Association Board. A quorum shall be representatives of a majority of the member churches. Churches shall be allowed to elect two alternates who will attend and vote in the absence of regular Association Board members. This Board shall determine the time and places of its meetings not later than December 31 for the ensuing year, and this information shall be published in the associational calendar.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, parliamentarian, direction of missions, department directors, chairperson of the Finance Committee, Baptist State Convention General Board Representative, and presidents of the associational youth council, and ministers' conference. The vice-moderator shall serve as chairperson of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee, cooperating with the director of missions, to devise ways and means, recommend measures and initiate action implementing promotion and missionary expansion within bounds of the association.

Section 3. The Committee of Committees: Shall consist of five members who will nominate the members of the various standing committees and present them for election at the annual meeting of the association. One member of the committee shall carry over each year to the new Committee on Committees with the provision that no member serve more than two consecutive years.

Section 4. The Nominating Committee: Shall consist of five members who present at the annual meeting a list of nominations for association offices, department directors, Baptist State Convention agency representatives, and as needed, recommend to the Association Board seven members to serve as a Director of Missions Search Committee.

Section 5. The Finance and Audit Committee: Shall be composed of seven members, including the treasurer and representing at least six different churches of the association, chosen so as to embrace reasonably the various geographical areas of the association. No member, exclusive of the treasurer, shall serve, nor any church be represented, more than two consecutive years. No more than four members of this committee shall be replaced during the associational year. It shall be the duty of the committee to draw up and submit the annual association budget to the Association Board for approval prior to the presentation at the annual meeting. Further, this body shall supervise the raising of funds to meet the budget and other miscellaneous needs. It shall make or cause to be made, an annual audit of the receipts and disbursements of all funds of the association and make a comprehensive report to the association at the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Program Committee: Shall consist of three members who shall plan well the program for the annual meeting. Copies of the program shall be distributed to the messengers and visitors at the annual meeting.

Section 7. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee: Shall consist of the following four members - moderator, vice-moderator, director of missions, and one member at large, who shall serve as chairperson of the committee. This committee shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the association. Its duties shall be to prepare and recommend changes, amendments or additions to the Constitution and Bylaws as may be necessary to serve better the purposes of the association.

Section 8. The Credentials Committee: Shall be composed of three members who shall review all applications from churches for membership in the association. This committee shall make a thorough investigation of the petitioning churches as to doctrine, practices, and cooperation with the Baptist program. A formal statement of its findings, along with a recommendation, shall be submitted to association in annual session or to the Association Board as provided in Article III, Section 2, of the constitution. This committee may be called upon by the moderator to serve as set forth in Article III, Section 2 (5) of the constitution.

Section 9. The Committee on Ordination: This committee shall consist of a chairperson who is elected by the association and all the pastors in the association. The committee shall examine the candidates who come before it, as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry, and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for the candidate. The committee shall help plan and arrange for proper services of ordination when such assistance is requested.

Section 10. The Committee on Resolutions: Shall consist of three members who will prepare and present to the association suitable resolutions of appreciation and expression of sentiments on any matter chosen by the committee or referred by the association.

Section 11. The Building and Grounds committee: Shall be composed of five persons. The committee shall inspect the associational properties periodically and assist in maintaining an inventory of equipment, develop and maintain maintenance policies and procedures; develop and recommend an adequate insurance plan to protect all buildings and properties; recommend cost of maintenance care of the property to the budget committee; assist in determining and administering parking space; promote the conservation of energy and other natural resources used in the operation of association properties; and make certain that the grounds are kept clean and in good repair and that trees, shrubs, and grass are healthy, properly nourished and trimmed.

ARTICLE V - REVISION OF BYLAWS

The association may amend or alter the by laws by a vote of two-thirds of messengers present at an annual meeting, provided that each change or amendment is submitted in writing on the first day of the session for vote on the following day. Each proposed change or amendment must be printed in the association newsletter in the last issue before the annual session.

V. Proceedings

of the

Forty-sixth Annual Session

IVES MEMORIAL BAPTIST CHURCH OCTOBER 16, 1995

- 1. Registration began at 6:30 pm with the host church registering messengers and guests. Mr. Jamie Smith, pianist at Ives Memorial church, played the prelude on the piano. The host church ensemble presented special music. Moderator Vivian Green called the forty-sixth annual session to order at 7:00 pm and recognized Rev. Bob Morrison who gave the devotion from 1 Samuel 12:17-21. Rev. Morrison received special requests to include in the opening prayer. The host pastor, Rev. Don Ballenger, extended a cordial welcome. Mrs. Sandi Ward led in singing the hymn, "O Zion Haste." Ives Memorial church choir blessed us in singing beautiful special music.
- 2. The motion presented by Dr. Al Martin, program chairman, that we accept the printed program for the order of service was approved. The moderator recognized and greeted all messengers and visitors and welcomed them to the forty-sixth annual session.
- 3. Rev. Max Gilmore gave the Credentials Committee report which included the reception of Cornerstone Baptist Church into membership of the association, September 18, 1995.
- 4. Mr. Dewitt Purvis, Clerk, gave the clerk's report, showing how the home and the church are tied together as a family. The digest of letters showed increases in most categories. Baptisms increased from 178 to 220 and total receipts to more than 3 million dollars. Appreciation is given to church clerks for using the diskettes in recording the information and statistics which will be recorded in the minute book.
- 5. The budget, under study since the May Board meeting, and approved at the September Board meeting, was adopted as presented by Mr. Bob Morrison, a member of the the Finance Committee.
- 6. In his report the director of missions mentioned the reception of Cornerstone church and the beginning of the new Freedom Baptist Mission with Rev. Gary Greene as pastor. One new staff member in the association is Rev. Jerry Armstrong of Aberdeen First. Rev. Joe Clontz, care person for our association from the Baptist State Convention, was recognized. The two major events last year were the Here's Hope revivals and the preparation for the World Missions Conference in the Fall. A motion that we participate in partnership with Southern Africa (South Africa, Swaziland, and Lesotho) was approved.
- 7. Mrs. Deanna Stockwell and the following WMU officers, Mrs. Margaret Shields, Mrs. Helen Hays, Mrs. Cathy Moore, Mrs. Judy Parker, and Mrs. Viola Bowlin, gave and inspiring WMU report. The WMU has had an excellent year in mission education and mission action.
- 8. Mr. Charles English gave the Brotherhood report, informing us of many needs and ministries involving Baptist men and boys, including Angel Tree, handy man ministry, and partnership missions. He invited our Baptist men to be involved in helping renovate Mundo Vista and to help in other mission projects.

- 9. During miscellaneous business Rev. Don Ballenger gave a report on Campbell University. The university has 6500 students enrolled from all 50 states and 45 countries. The school seeks to graduate a large per cent of its students and to do it under the theme of Christian influence.
- 10. Rev. Charles Hinson gave the World Missions Conference report, stating that 22 churches were participating and that each church would be able to hear 5 missionaries (state, home, and foreign). The conference is scheduled for October 29-November 1, 1995, jointly sponsored with the Pee Dee Baptist Association, which will have the missionaries from November 2-5.
- 11. Mr. Curt Bettini gave the Property and Grounds Committee report, reviewing the process for building the associational center and thanking the churches for support in the project to pave the lots and driveway and to complete the landscaping. The paving is due to be completed within one week.

12. Mrs. Sandi Ward led in singing the hymn, "Take the Name of Jesus with You." Then Sandi introduced Mrs. Jean Knight of Fayetteville, a music evangelist, who sang

"When He Was on the Cross," and "What a Day."

13. The director of missions introduced Mr. Bill Harris, professor of religion, Sandhills Community College, who gave an inspiring and informative presentation on missions in the Holy Land.

14. The registration for the Monday evening session was 108 messengers and 26 visitors. Rev. Richard Hodges, pastor at Taylor Memorial church, gave the closing prayer and benediction. Following adjournment, the host church served delicious refreshments in the church fellowship hall.

AFTERNOON SESSION

- 1. Registration began at 6:30 pm. The prelude was given by Mrs. Shirley Sheffield of the host church. Moderator Vivian Green called the meeting to order at 4:00pm. With Mrs. Sandi Ward at the piano, Mr. Sammy Myrick led in singing the hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story." Rev. Max Gilmore presented a devotion on "Preaching the Word" from John 1:1.
 - 2. Rev. Bill Reynolds, host pastor, extended a warm welcome.

3. Rev. Jesse Mansfield gave the Pastoral Ministries report, informing us that this department seeks to help equip deacons and pastors for more effective ministry.

4. Rev. Don Ballenger gave the Evangelism report, sharing the good results from

the Here's Hope revivals.

- 5. Mr. Grady Culler reported that over 200 senior adults attended the annual senior adult fellowship dinner at Beulah Hill church in May. Senior adults are encouraged to participate in the many senior adult conferences in the state.
- 6. Rev. Stephen Burrow, new Sunday School director, reported that the ASST team is available to help churches in Sunday School work. There will be a one day Sunday School training workshop, led by Dr. Mike Perry of the BSSB, on leadership skills at Robbins First on November 11.
- 7. Rev. Gary Bodford reported that there were several associational youth events during the year, including quarterly covered dish meals with leaders and a project with Habitat for Humanity.

- 8. Mrs. Sandi Ward gave the Music report, stating that she would continue to promote 3 major music events that have proven to be successful: the appreciation banquet for music leaders, music leaders training, and associational choir sing. This year the plan is to invite special groups such as duets, quartets and ensembles to an associational sing event.
- 9. Rev. John Stone reported that he enjoyed representing the association on the Christian Social Ministries Council of the N C State General Board, expressed appreciation for the excellent cooperation of the members of the General Board and encouraged our support for the many worthy ministries through our Baptist State Convention.

10. Rev. Charles Hinson introduced Dr. Dewey Hobbs who spoke on our Baptist Hospital ministries and of the significant ministries of the pastoral care department. There are over 806 beds with the plan to have 946 beds in the next year. The hospital staff is willing to help in all circumstances. Dr. Hobbs will be a candidate for the presidency of the state convention this year.

- 11. Mrs. Deanna Stockwell introduced Mrs. Irma Duke, executive director for the Baptist State Convention, WMU department, who read from II Timothy 2:21 and spoke on Women in Ministry. Mrs. Duke gave several examples of how WMU is helping all kinds of people and serving with the men in the life of the churches in the state and denomination.
- 12. The moderator recognized Mr. Robert Williams who spoke briefly of the Baptist Children's Home ministries and thanked the churches for their prayers and support.
- 13. Rev. D C Sullivan spoke on behalf of the SBC Annuity Board and encouraged us to give support to some needy annuitant, pastor or widow, who is on a low retirement income. For \$50 a month an annuitant can be adopted.
- 14. A very meaningful memorial service from John 17:13 -19 was led by Chaplain Carolyn Helms. Following the reading of the names of 69 members from our churches who have gone to be with the Lord, the congregation stood in a moment of reverence and respect, and Carolyn led us in the following prayer:

"Father, I am coming to you" (John 17:11).

Jesus, your departure was such an ache; your going away left a hollow in hearts, a tension between the love of your friends and the welcome awaiting you in going home to the Father. Such a mixture of feelings must have spun around in you: the sadness of your last farewell to friends and the anticipation of joy in the father's welcome. You were leaving and sorely distressed. The medical dental van came to Southern Pines First in the Fall of 1994.
- 20. Mrs. Margaret Shields presented the report for the Committee on Committees, thanking all committee members for the good response and their willingness to serve.

21. In the absence of Mr. Glenn Crissman, Mr. Robert Cook gave the Nominations

committee report which was adopted as given.

Moderator Vivian Green was recognized and thanked for his 2 years of service as moderator and presented a plaque for faithful service.

28. Rev. Charles Taylor installed the incoming officers in a very meaningful service of

installation. Dr. Bill Walton offered the prayer of dedication.

29. Mrs. Sandi Ward introduced Rev. Ed Bullock, director of evangelism development, Baptist State Convention, and sang "Lord, I will Worship You." Rev. Bullock brought the closing message of the session on Matthew 9:36-38, with emphasis on compassion, witness, and service for God. The challenge was to us all to seek to bring a lost soul to Christ. Sandi Ward. With Sandi Ward at the piano, Rev. Benny Edwards led us in singing the hymn, "Set my Soul Afire."

30. The moderator thanked the association for the privilege of serving as moderator and vice-moderator, recognized the new moderator, Rev. Ed Johnson, who received the gavel,

called the session to adjournment and led in the closing prayer.

2. Clerk's Report and Digest of Letters

Almost every church used the electronic diskette to record the Annual Church Profile last year and this year. We had some problem with the new Sunday School Board disk. In most cases we were able to work out the problem with some help from Rev. Ed Johnson and a consultant at the BSSB. We want to thank all the church clerks and all the church leaders who assisted the clerks in completing the church letters and getting them in to the association on time so that we could complete the digest of letters and the clerk's report.

In 1994-95 the Association Board and the Association Executive committee met three times, in January, May, and September. There was good representation from the churches at the meetings. Reports were given and business of the association was transacted. The association calendar was adopted at the May Board meeting and the proposed budget for the next year was presented for information. Cornerstone Baptist Church was voted into membership of the association at the September Board meeting and the association voted to grant permission to the New Freedom Baptist mission to use the association center, with evaluation of their progress in one year. The association voted to adopt the Property and Grounds Committee's recommendation to pave the parking lots and driveway and complete the landscaping at the site.

Presently, the association has a total of 29 churches and 1 mission in affiliation. The churches are located in 4 counties - Moore, Lee, Hoke, and Harnett counties - with most church in Moore County. The church letters indicate that the churches increased in baptisms from 178 to 216 in total receipts from \$2,889,309 to \$3,188,227.


The prayer retreat for pastors in preparation for the "Here's Hope, Share Jesus Now" crusade went well. But there only 4 pastors other than J. Billy and me.



In Project Help (Hunger) this year we collected 2,280 cans of food along with \$287.47, 204 pairs of socks for Nursing Care Centers, 12 Gift Bags for Friend to Friend Christmas. The WMU also had ongoing projects that they took part in, such as providing birthday cakes and flannel shirts to the Cameron Boys Home, and taking fruit to the Children's Center. They also collected clothes, toys, and books to help with the needs for other people and other organizations.

The WMU Council had four planning and prayer times this past year. There were 13 attending workshops at Camp Caraway.

Our Annual WMU Banquet was enjoyed by 164 people at First Baptist Church in Southern Pines. The guest speaker and special music was provided by Renea Henderson. Victory Baptist Church hosted our Annual WMU meeting with 70 people attending. Our special guest was Patricia Frazier who brought along Judessa Kidsky. Judessa Kidsky enlightened us about our new WMU, Women on Mission and Youth Group. Our special speaker Chaplain Carolyn Helms challenged us with a great message on love. Special thanks to Victory Baptist Church.

At our WMU Training Leadership workshop which was held at Taylor Memorial Baptist Church, we had 60 leaders to attend. They were briefed on our new WMU names and our new theme, "Risk the Journey" in the next year. We had 76 people attending our WMU Prayer Retreat at Lemon Springs Baptist Church. The service and prayer was lead by Dr. Albert Edwards, with special music sung by Jan Anderson. At the State Annual WMU MIssions Extravaganza at Ridgecrest in March there were 20 people in attendance. The Baptist Women met for a training session in October & November with 110 people attending. We covered changes in the WMU and improving programs and mission work in the churches.

The Acteens, this year, participated in projects such as the World Missions Fair with 65 attending. They also enjoyed the Acteens Lock-Out in March with 197 attending. They started the journey by traveling to Raleigh to Exhilirama, then continuing to the Ice House and winding up with a mission study led by Renea Henderson. In August, The Acteens had a "Pizza Bash" with 60 people in attendance; guest speaker was Carolyn Helms and Sandi Ward leading in group activities.

On November 11th, the GA's enjoyed a Lock-In with 17 girls attending. They enjoyed Nat Howell, volunteer missionary to Africa, who told us about his work in Africa. The Mission Friends worked on activities within their own churches.

The community Thanksgiving service at Bethesda Presbyterian was held on November 20. Foreign Mission Study was taught by Pastor Charles Hinson and Gary Bodford. On December 2, the Sanctuary, Keen-Ager and Handbell Choirs participated in the Christmas Tree Lighting in Pinehurst. On December 4, the Sanctuary, Keen-Ager

and Handbell Choirs presented the evening Christmas music program at Emmanuel Baptist church. Community Christmas Eve service was held at our church with Rev. Hinson delivering message. 


