Reports on Missions, Conference Evangelism, Orphanage, P. H. Y. S. and Sunday schools read and adopted. Report of Woman's Auxiliary adopted. Resolutions report adopted as amended.

The following resolution as read by Jas. W. Butler was adopted: Be it resolved that the North Carolina Conference endorse the program and work of the Allied Church League for the Abolition of Beverage Alcohol, The Woman's Temperance Union and the American Business Men's Research Foundation which are actively fighting the traffic in beverage alcohol.

We offer as expression of our support the gift of \$100 to the Allied Church League to aid in the campaign against intoxicating

beverages in the state of North Carolina.

A motion that conference request the official board to make some

provision for the underpaid fulltime pastors, prevailed.

Butler as Editor of Conference Evangel. A motion authorizing the official board to purchase a mimeograph and adding machine prevailed.

The conference ordered fifteen hundred copies of the minutes

printed.

On motion the official board was requested to begin work on the conference dormitory as soon as practicable.

Report of Committee on Nominations for P. H. Y. S. Officials read

and adopted.

W. B. Godwin was elected President of Sunday School Association, Miss Daisy Jones Vice-President and Miss Nettie Marshburn Secretary and Treasurer. Jas. W. Butler was elected Editor of the Conference Evangel and O. T. Howard Associate Editor and Business Manager.

Report of Committee on Nominations for Woman's Auxiliary Officials read and adopted. By motion the nominations for P. H. Y. S.

and Woman's Auxiliary be confirmed by the official board.

The Superintendent and assistant Superintendent were elected Camp Meeting Managers.

By motion the Board of Examiners were reelected.

On motion Jas. W. Butler is to represent the conference in the Allied Church League. A rising vote of thanks was given to Bishop Beacham for the fine way he presided over the conference.

The report of the Committee on Division of Labor was read and adopted. The conference adjourned upon the reading of the minutes.

MINUTES OF THE OFFICIAL BOARD MEETINGS 1945-46

The Board was called to Goldsboro Sept. 12 to investigate a complaint from the Wilmington Church concerning the pastor I. D. Dickens being transferred. The majority of the church desired him to remain

owing to the huge debt on the church property. After taking everything into consideration, the Board authorized the superintendent to reappoint Mr. Dickens pastor. W. E. Thompson having been assigned Goldsboro and W. H. Morris Wilmington, Mr. Thompson offered his resignation as pastor of Goldsboro in favor of Mr. Morris remaining in Goldsboro. Mr. Thompson was appointed pastor of New Bern Church.

Other items of business: Arrangements for the new treasurer to accept the books from the former treasurer as soon as bank statements were all in.

Board met in Wilson Sept. 24 (Mr. Berry absent) to investigate complaints from Wilson Church concerning the pastor W. J. Lynch being transferred. The majority of the members desired Mr. Lynch to remain, but after taking everything into consideration, the board ruled that Mr. Lynch accept his appointment made by the conference and move to Fayetteville which he did.

The transfer of J. D. Wheeler from the East Oklahoma Conference was abproved. A loan of \$85 was made to O. D. Lambert.

Board met in Goldsboro Oct. 11 with all members present.

The books of the former treasurer were approved and turned over to the new treasurer with a cash balance of \$4,475.41. Mr. Strickland was paid \$25.00 to cover all expenses in board meetings.

A loan was made to Mt. Olive church building. The date of the Christian Worker's Institute was set for March 25 through April 5. G. H. Montgomery, Miss Ethel Strickland, Ralph R. Johnson and W. B. Godwin were named instructors.

The superintendent was authorized to purchase cots to be used during camp meeting and conference. Reverends H. T. Spence and Raymond O. Corvin were selected for camp meeting ministers. A loan of \$300 was made to the Farmville Church. The note of W. N. Bass (Amount \$32.00) was canceled and a donation of \$18.00 given him to cover expenses incurred in a car wreck. It was decided that services be held in each church during Pentecost Week.

W. J. Morris, O. T. Howard, W. H. Morris, W. E. Thompson and V. W. Callahan were elected Conference Radio Committee.

A cooperative plan was worked out with the P. H. Y. S. and S. S., also Evangelistic Committees for the year.

Board met in Goldsboro Dec. 13 to investigate rumors that W. J. Lynch was raising funds and contemplating an independent church in Wilson. The superintendent had written him a letter asking if such rumors were true, but Mr. Lynch failed to reply. Mr. Lynch signed a statement in the presence of the board that such rumors were false and he would not give the Wilson Church any further trouble.

A donation of \$100 was made to the St. Matthew-Goshen parsonage from the conference treasury. A loan of \$450 was made to Jas. R. Williams. A loan of \$400 and a donation of \$100 was made to the General Home Mission Board. The transfer of Mrs. Fannie Mae Jones from S. C. Conference was confirmed.

Board met in Goldsboro Jan. 10. The note of T. O. Todd was renewed at his request. A donation of \$250 was made on the National Church Building in Washington. The superintendent was authorized

to purchase a lot in Falcon on which to erect a dormitory. A loan

of \$225 to C. E. Hester and \$1000 to J. W. Berry.

Board was called to Goldsboro Feb. 18 to investigate charges brought against I. D. Dickens and Miss Daisy Jones by Misses Jesse Faircloth and Irene Gaskins, concerning a telephone conversation. After hearing the case there was found conflicts in the testimonies and irregularity, but not sufficient evidence to convict. Mr. Dickens requested the board to accept his resignation of the Wilmington Church that he could enter the evangelistic field. His request was granted.

A group from Hodges Chapel Church were present to discuss the election of a camp meeting manager for Piney Grove Camp Meeting. All agreed that the selection of a manager by the conference board

would be satisfactory. E. W. Downing was elected.

Board met in Wilmington March 13 to further consider the resignation of the pastor I. D. Dickens. The church felt that he ought to continue his pastorate there, but he stated that he felt definitely led to enter evangelistic work, which he did.

Board met in Greenville May 13. N. J. Medford, treasurer of superannuate funds having passed away, and in view of the short time until annual conference, the board decided to carry on without

filling the vacancy.

By motion the books of the treasurer of superannuate funds were turned over to Jerome Hodges, conference treasurer. A donation of \$50 was made to W. J. Noble to help defray expenses incurred by the illness of Mrs. Noble.

The board decided to continue the Radio Broadcast for another

series.

Board met in Goldsboro, July 30 to nominate committees to serve at the 1946 session of the conference. Other items of business: It was decided that meals be served at 50c. each during camp meeting. The transfers of B. B. Sellers, Mrs. B. B. Sellers, and Vernon Clark from the S. C. Conference; and C. R. McCartney from the East Oklahoma Conference were confirmed.

Miss Pearl Bordeaux, having had a hospital expense, a donation of \$50 was made to her. A donation of \$50 was made to the Millennium

Church parsonage from the conference treasury.

The Board met in Falcon Aug. 24 to hear charges against W. J. Lynch by J. W. Berry. After hearing the evidence the charges were sustained. The board found that Mr. Lynch was guilty of irregularities in his business affairs unbecoming to a minister, and that his loyalty to the church has not been above question, and concerning certain reports or statements made, has appeared evasive in his reply to the statements.

We therefore feel that he should sign a written apology to be read to the conference. Mr. Lynch agreed to do this.

The Apology

I sincerely regret anything in my conduct that has not been in keeping with the principles and truths for which we stand as a church, and am sorry for any injury that has been done to any individual or the conference by anything that I have said or done, and by the grace

of God I will prove my loyalty to the church and the full gospel for which we stand in the future.

Report of W. B. Godwin, President S. S. Association

Following the last annual conference I called a meeting of the board of the Sunday School Association, at which Miss Ethel Strickland was elected Director of Religious Education in order that she might aid said board in performing the duties assigned to it.

I believe I visited all of the ninety some churches in the conference except one, and I made an effort to go to that one but failed.

I arranged and conducted fourteen Sunday School Conferences, at which fifty-nine Sunday schools rendered programs and the Falcon Orphanage rendered six. Several other schools were represented either by letter, a delegate, or delegation. Many people from the Missionary Baptist, Free Will Baptist, Methodist and Christian Churches cooperated with us. There was a vast amount and great variety of truth presented on these occasions which was highly instructive, deeply inspiring and beneficial. The presence of God was manifested in many outstanding ways. Saints rejoiced and praised God for His wonderful works to the children of men.

Sixty-two ministers and two hundred and sixty-seven officers and teachers participated in these conferences making reports of their work. Bountiful repasts were served on the grounds at all these conventions and of course was much enjoyed by all.

With two or three exceptions the attendance was large and in some

instances very large. Cash offerings of \$390.72 was received for

famine relief and \$139.00 for the Falcon Orphanage.

I preached, lectured and talked to the young people altogether one hundred and thirty times. I taught the Sunday school lesson a number of times. I gave the Teacher Training Course in the Christian Workers Institute. I also visited and prayed with the sick. I received \$716.23 in free will offerings and \$130.00 from the Sunday School Association treasury as three cents per mile traveling expense, making a total of \$846.23. I gave \$274.65; fifty of which went to the conference treasury.

The people have been very kind and cooperative, God bless them a thousand-fold. Above all God has been faithful, for which I praise

Him.

Report of Committee on Education

Despite the perplexing problems and unsettled conditions of this modern age, we must recognize our obligation to support the educational institutions of the Pentecostal Holiness Church. Christian education is necessary to preserve the mental and spiritual life of our young people. One of the most important obligations of our church to the youth is that of spiritual and religious training.

Our church schools are worthy of support and endorsement. Emmanuel College and Holmes Bible College have performed great service to the church and its young people in their preparation for life and Christian service. Our continued support and patronage are necessary to enable them to grow and make the progress necessary to meet the needs of our people adequately along this line. The effort of the church to establish a school in the West is to be commended and we

desire success and progress for that institution.

In view of the fact that the educational program of the church now includes plans for a four year college at Franklin Springs and a seminary at Greenville, and a school for the West, we recommend that this conference petition the Board of Education of the Pentecostal Holiness Church to allow the establishment of a school for the conferences of the eastern seaboard. Further, in view of the past history of the Falcon school, and the buildings and equipment available together with its geographical location, we would in this petition request that the Falcon school be reestablished and operated for the benefit of the young people of these conferences, viz. North Carolina, Western North Carolina, Virginia, Eastern Virginia, South Carolina, and Florida. Also that we request these conferences to join us in the petition to the Board of Education, and request that school work be started in the fall of 1947. We further recommend that there be appointed a Board of Education from the official personnel of these conferences and the Falcon Orphanage to act as the sponsoring board for this institution.

We further endorse the program of teaching the Bible in the public schools of our state.

We recommend that all pastors aid and assist our prospective ministers in the study of the courses of study persuant to the requirements as prerequisite in obtaining license for the ministry.

We recommend the Pentecostal Holiness Advocate, Youth Leader, Conference Evangel, Our Children of Falcon Orphanage Monthly, and other wholesome religious literature in harmony with our doctrine and temperance.

Report of Committee on Finance

We, your Committee on Finance, submit the following:

We believe that the system of paying tithes, and giving offerings is the one and only plan God has instituted in His Word for His work. We call attention to the General Conference Finance Committee's report and the recommendation that all our members, ministers and laymen pay tithes so that all phases of God's work may be adequately supported.

We further recommend:

1. That all lay members pay their tithes into the local church treasury; that the pastor encourage the election of officials who comply with the tithing system.

2. That ministers of the North Carolina Conference pay fifty per cent (50%) of all their tithes into the conference treasury, and the remaining fifty per cent (50%) into the church treasury where the minister holds membership or may serve.

3. That no minister shall be elected to any official position who

does not comply with above system.

4. That all churches pay their pastors their regular salary for the Sabbath during the annual conference session.

5. That in case of changing pastors, the local church shall defray

the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

6. It is to be appreciated the way the majority of our churches have supported their pastors this past year, but in view of the rising cost of living we recommend that the salary of the pastor be increased where practicable.

7. That each local church establish a central treasury and that ten per cent (10%) of funds be sent to the North Carolina Conference and the conference treasurer send ten per cent (10%) to the Gen-

eral Treasury.

8. That funds raised by each local church for the following causes: Foreign Missions, Orphanage, Education, General Evangelism and General Fund, be sent to the conference treasury to be forwarded

monthly to the General Treasury.

9. That the Conference Superintendent be paid fifty (\$50) dollars per week as annual salary to be paid monthly, and five (5) cents per mile for traveling expenses. All offerings received by the Conference Superintendent in his work in this conference shall be credited to his salary.

10. That the following appropriations be made:

Fifteen per cent (15%) of the conference receipts be placed in the evangelistic fund. Twenty per ment (20%) of conference receipts be placed in the Superannuate Fund.

Report of Committee on Superannuate Funds

The Committee on Superannuate Funds makes the following recommendations:

1. All beneficiaries of the superannuate funds must pay one-half of all their tithes into the conference treasury.

2. Ministers who have served ten years or more shall receive a

maximum of \$25.00 per month when superannuated.

3. That the following benefits shall be paid monthly for the ensuing year: Rev. S. C. Hodges \$15.00; Rev. H. E. Oxendine \$15.00; Mrs. Beadie Noble \$20.00; Rev. C. B. Strickland \$25.00; Rev. M. H. Alexander \$25.00; Rev. A. H. Butler \$25.00; Rev. J. G. Spivey \$25.00.

4. If at any time an emergency shall arise with respect to the above paragraphs (viz. 2 and 3) consideration can be made by the

Conference Official Board.

5. That any minister who has complied with paragraph one, in case of death, \$100.00 be paid on his or her burial expenses; this also

applies to wife or husband.

- 6. That all promissory notes given for loans made from the superannuate fund be endorsed by a member of the P. H. Church or Annual Conference, and loans of \$100.00 or more be endorsed by two members of the P. H. Church or Annual Conference.
- 7. That loans made from the superannuate fund be paid back monthly, quarterly, or annually.

8. That interest be charged at the rate of 6% per annum.

9. That any note paid within thirty days after loan is made shall bear no interest. However, a service charge of 1% shall be made.

10. That instead of having a separate treasury for the superannuate fund, that it be handled through the conference treasury.

That we, in accordance with the words of Christ, consider the field to be the world, not just one corner, whether North, East, South or West but that the whole world is the field, and that in the light of this truth we pledge our earnest efforts to the evangelization of the 70,000,000 unsaved and unchurched here in America.

2. That we endeavor to evangelize with the Latter Rain message every state and country where we have not as yet established churches, and that we fully cooperate with the General Home Mission program in

carrying forward this endeavor.

3. That in order to become a universal, world-wide church such as the gospel of Christ has intended, we cannot overlook the need of our Mexican and South American neighbors, also to feel our indebtedness to the neglected islands that dot the oceans which surround the shores of our homeland.

4. That our present foreign mission program be fully supborted with our prayers and money, and that we keep the ever increasing needs of foreign missions before our people through local societies

and special missionary services.

5. That all local churches of this conference send monthly offerings to the General Treasurer through the Conference Treasurer, in support of our home and foreign mission work, and that our financial goal be not less than the amount requested by the General Conference.

6. That our pastors and evangelists keep constantly before their congregations the cause of world-wide evangelism for which primary

purpose God raised us up.

7. That we give ourselves to special prayer and sacrificial giving to the end that God will help us to evangelize Japan, Germany, Russia and other countries which we have not as yet entered with the gospel of our Lord Jesus, regardless of their attitude and position during the recently ended war.

Thus, in being faihful in carrying out the great commission of Christ we shall continue to have His blessings upon us and fill the place in the world for which we have, as a church been providentially

raised up.

Report of Committee on Sunday School and P. H. Y. S.

There are thirty-six million young people in America with no religious instruction. Catholics provide 200 hours of religious instruction per year for their children, and the Jews provide 325 hours

for theirs, while Protestants provide only an average of 30 hours for theirs.

The Bible in the public schools, the teaching pastor and the teaching parent and the family altar are almost a matter of history. Since the repeal of the eighteenth amendment, juvenile delinquency has increased by leaps and bounds. The liquor and tobacco traffic, with all other agencies of the devil are making a determined effort to capture the youth of our land. The powers of darkness seem to have set themselves to defy the church of the Living God.

All these things constitute a mighty challenge to our Sunday schools and Pentecostal Holiness Youth's Societies.

Therefore we recommend:

That there be elected at this annual conference a President, Vice President and Secretary-Treasurer, who shall be the head officials of, and direct all the activities of the Sunday School Association of the North Carolina Conference of the Pentecostal Holiness Church.

That each local Sunday school pay tithes into their Annual Sunday School Association treasury; that the Annual Sunday School Association pay tithes into the General Sunday School Association treasury

That three cents per mile be paid the officials of the Sunday School Association for traveling expenses in connection with their Sunday school work.

That, insofar as possible or practical the Presidents of the Sunday School Association and P. H. Y. S. devote their time to the interests of their respective work.

That all pastors have a monthly meeting of the officials of the S. S. and P. H. Y. S. to counsel together, in order to determine what are the best ways, means and methods of promoting the work assigned to their hands.

That the instructors of our S. S. and P. H. Y. S. do personal work, and strive to lead their unsaved pupils to Christ, and into the deeper experiences of grace.

That we make use of all the modern means, methods and ways at our command to teach the Word of God.

Latest statistics reveal that the age of thirteen is the pinacle of the conversion curve, and that the chances are three to one against a person getting saved after twenty-one. Therefore, let us bring the children into the fold while young.

That each pastor encourage teacher training and see to it that a Daily Vacation Bible School be conducted in the church of which he is pastor, if at all possible. The officers of the S. S. Association will be glad to assist in this work.

In all our efforts there must be supreme emphasis on deep spirituality, without which, all of our activities will be in vain.

We, your Committee on Resolutions submit the following:

That the 1947 Falcon Camp Meeting embrace the last two Sundays in August, and that the annual conference embrace the last Sunday of the camp meeting. That the local pastor and conference superintendent shall be in charge of all arrangements and handling of camp meeting and conference entertainment.

That an institution for Christian workers be held at Falcon in the spring of 1947, the date to be determined by the conference board, that a faculty be named and courses of study planned by the conference official board. We suggest that Bishop Paul F. Beacham be invited

as the main speaker.

In view of the importance of the baptism of the Holy Ghost, to the ministry of the Pentecostal Holiness Church, we caution the Board of Examiners to go slowly in recommending ministers for ordination, that do not have the baptism of the Holy Ghost.

We recommend that no church lot or church building be purchased by any preacher or congregation until it is approved by the

conference official board.

We recommend that our conference superintendent be given one week of vacation during the year with pay, and the right to conduct one revival or camp meeting out of the bounds of the conference during the year. The pay received in this meeting shall not apply to his salary.

We as a conference insist that the moving pastor refrain from making frequent visits to his old pastorate to the extent that he may cause confusion and lack of cooperaion of the church with the new pastor.

We recommend that the official board serve as a nominating committee for all committees.

That all prayer meetings held in a radius of one mile of a Pentecostal Holiness Church be under the direction of the pastor or church board, if at all possible.

We recommend that a man be employed to keep the camp grounds and buildings in a sanitary condition during camp meeting and con-

ference.


6. We wish to urge that the president and the directors of the conference in visiting the societies to impress the importance of these facts which have been included in this report upon the minds of our
