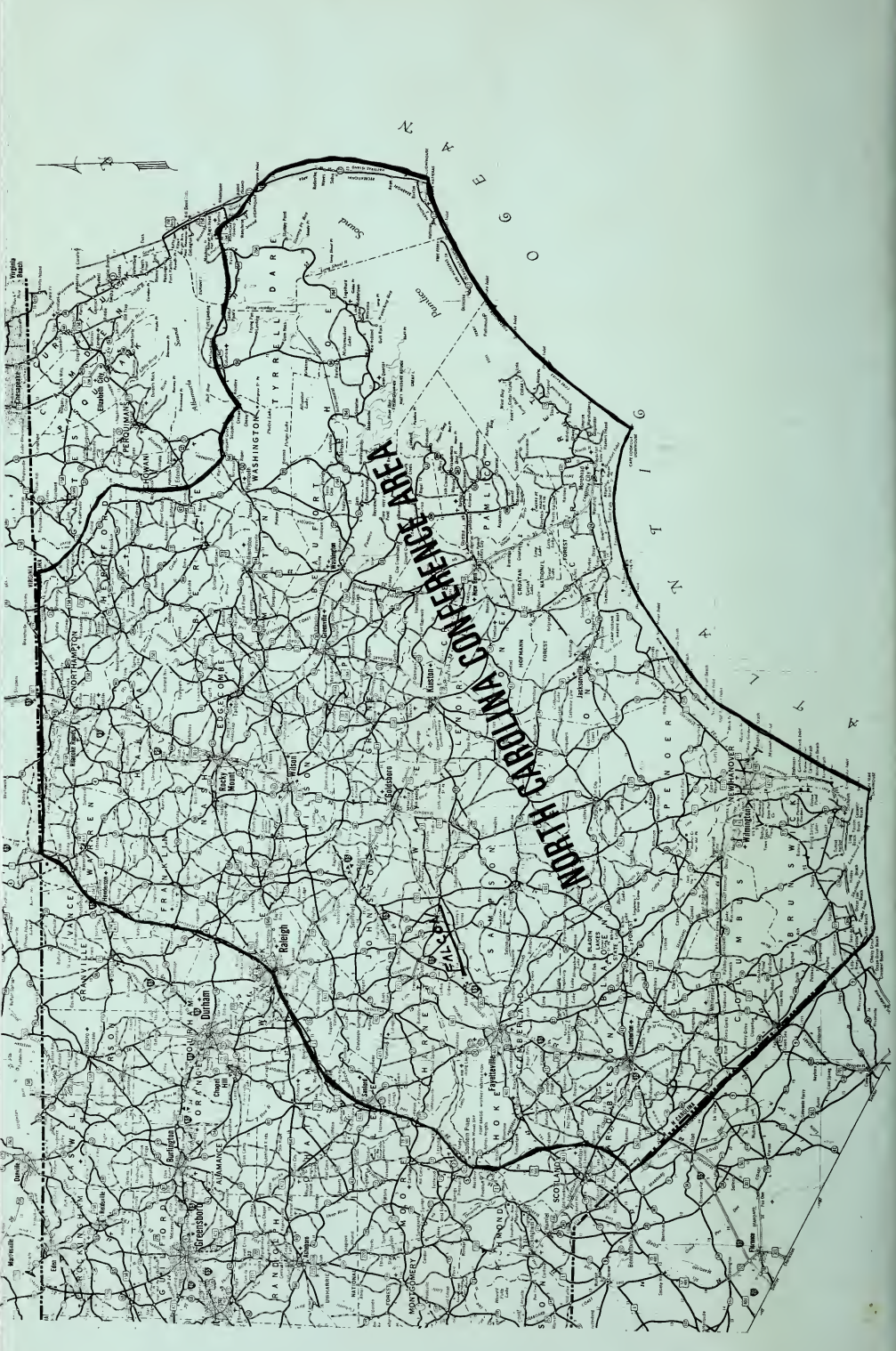

BY-LAWS

Ministers' Records

All ministers shall keep a record of their work, number of sermons preached, and personal finances, on forms provided by the conference.

Names of all deceased ministers to be listed in the Conference Minutes.

A complete roster of local churches with complete addresses including rural routes, highway numbers, zip codes and telephone numbers be listed in the Minutes. (They are listed by districts.)

Each church shall mail quarterly reports to the conference office within ten (10) days after the end of each quarter, namely: Mar. 31, June 30, and September 30. The annual report ending December 31 shall be in the office by January 10.

Voting for Pastor

Each church voting for pastor shall use official ballots approved by the General Conference. The vote shall be taken on the fourth Sunday in May preceding the Biennial Conference. All absentee ballots shall be sealed and signed by the eligible voter on the outside of the envelope. Results of the voting shall be forwarded to the superintendent within twenty-four hours.

All ministers and churches shall take into consideration that the ministerial assignments are for two years according to the rule of the General Conference, and they shall cease from seeking convenient ways to evade this ruling in an effort to make changes in pastorates in the mid-year term.

If a pastor indicates to his church that he desires to serve another term, but then later decides otherwise and requests to be moved, this request must be in writing and a copy presented to the Stationing Committee for study before the request shall be granted.

If it be deemed feasible to re-appoint to his current pastorate a minister who has the favorable vote and declares to the Stationing Committee his desire to return to his pastorate, a two-thirds majority of those voting for pastor shall be considered a favorable vote.

Ministers shall be informed of their appointment during consultation with the Stationing Committee, and if afterwards a re-adjustment has to be made, the committee shall grant the minister another consultation.

If a church votes for a pastor and the church delegate or delegates should go before the committee and petition it contrary to the vote of the church, such petition or request must be in writing and a copy filed with the committee.

No person other than duly elected church delegates shall consult with the Stationing Committee concerning pastoral assignments unless the pastor and delegates involved are invited to attend the meeting.

Work of Stationing Committee

The Stationing Committee shall deliberate on matters related to ministerial assignments and shall have ample time for interviews with lay delegates and ministers before reaching a final decision.

The Nominating Committee shall consider nominating those who have not served on the committee. A person shall serve once within a period of six years.

Ministerial Candidates for License and Ordination

Application for admission into the conference shall be made to the superintendent.

All candidates for the ministry shall have been a member of a local Pentecostal Holiness Church a minimum of six months before the convening of the conference. This requirement shall not apply to ministers transferring from another conference.

All candidates shall satisfy the Committee on Examination that they have met the requirements of the General Conference **Manual** for license and ordination.

The Committee on Examination shall not consider the application of any person for admission into the conference for license or transfer from other denominations unless such a person is sponsored by three Pentecostal Holiness ministers who vouch for the character of the applicant. (Ordained ministers coming from other denominations shall not be required to take the written examination.)

The Committee on Examination shall carefully examine the credit rating of all candidates.

All candidates for ordination shall have completed courses offered at Holmes Theological Seminary, Southwestern Bible College, or Emmanuel College, as students in residence or by correspondence, or a course of study approved by the General Conference. This shall not be interpreted to require more than the **Manual** prescribes or to permit exemption from examination.

The Committee on Examination, comprised of six members, shall continue to function in examining ministerial candidates. Two members shall be elected at each annual session to serve for three years on a rotating basis.

Deeds

No property shall be accepted in the conference with a revertible clause in the deed.

Local Church Official Boards

The local church shall refrain from electing to the official board more than one member of an immediate family in its congregation, except in cases where it is unavoidable.

Each member of the local church board shall be required to furnish evidence that he or she pays tithes into the church where he or she may serve.

Resolutions

All resolutions offered from the floor of the conference shall bear at least 5 signatures, and not more than the number constituting the Resolutions Committee membership.

Finances—Minister and Church

In pastoral changes, the local church shall be responsible for the moving of the incoming pastor.

Each church shall support the conference financial system by sending monthly ten (10%) percent of its income from regular tithes and offerings to the conference treasury. In case of failure to comply with this regulation the superintendent may ask for an explanation for delay in payment.

The conference shall support the General Budget, and funds raised for World Missions, Children's Home, Education and other designated agencies are to be sent to the conference treasury monthly. Churches complying with this regulation may be permitted to earmark special offerings.

All members of the conference shall pay one hundred (100%) percent tithes into the conference. Failure to comply with this regulation shall subject one to excommunication from the conference.

In addition to the tithe, all active (those not superannuated) members shall pay one (1%) percent of their net income, or \$50.00, whichever is more, monthly for superannuation. Failure to do this forfeits one from drawing superannuation benefits.

All tithes are to be paid on or before the twentieth of each month. Names of ministers who fail to comply, at the discretion of the superintendent, may be published in the **Evangel**, or they may be notified by letter every third month.

The conference year shall end December 31; therefore all tithes of ministers and churches must be paid by January 7.

In view of the high cost of living and maintaining adequate transportation for the minister, and in view of the feeling that an adequately supported minister can and will do a better job; then it becomes mandatory that:

1. Each local church pay the parsonage utilities (electricity, fuel, water and telephone) separate and apart from the salary of a full-time minister. This shall also apply to the conference parsonage.

2. On pastoral charges where there is no parsonage, these churches shall pay the pastor's rent and charge it to a parsonage fund.

3. Full-time evangelists shall have the privilege of deducting rent from their evangelistic compensation. (Full-time means the minister does not customarily resort to non-ministerial employment.)

4. The church board shall review the pastor's salary at least once a year and grant increases in salary in keeping with diligence, merit, service of a pastor, and in growth of the church for which he is responsible.

5. Churches shall pay the pastor's salary the Sunday during the conference session.

6. The superintendent shall confer with the church boards in the matter of pastoral support where the need is apparent.

7. Churches are encouraged to pay the insurance premiums for the pastor. (Conference treasurer to pay premium for the superintendent, and Christian Education fund treasurer pay premium for the Christian Education Director.)

8. "Since full-time ministers have no secular retirement benefits, we recommend that their social security payment be paid by the local church." Resolution 1972.

In keeping with the General Conference Minutes of 1969, the conference board shall review and adjust the salary of the superintendent, and all personnel employed by the conference. Finance 1972.

The rate of ten cents per mile shall be paid for all official travel.

The conference treasurer shall be authorized to pay the moving expenses of a retiring minister.

Vacations

The conference superintendent shall be given a two weeks' vacation with pay each year. He shall be permitted to conduct two revival campaigns outside the conference boundary at his discretion, and any compensation for such services shall not apply on his salary. A full-time minister shall be granted a two weeks' vacation each year, and shall be permitted to conduct not more than 3 one week revivals or their equivalent each year.

Local Church—Ministerial Relations

All evangelistic campaigns, prayer meetings, or religious exercises conducted by members within a radius of one mile of a local church shall be under the supervision of the local pastor.

Pastors shall refrain from making frequent visits to former pastorates to the extent that it may cause confusion and create a lack of cooperation of the church with the current pastor.

The chairman of the ushers in each local church must be a member of the Pentecostal Holiness Church. He shall be appointed by the local church board on the basis of his exemplary Christian dedication, appropriate personality and ability.

No pastor or member of a local church shall engage in any effort to solicit absentee votes, or campaigning, either for or against the incumbent pastor. Superannuated ministers and local evangelists shall refrain from any activity which will have the effect of retarding the growth and progress of the local church, and which may result in the interference with the program of the current pastor.

Each minister, when moving from a church shall leave a complete file of members, with addresses and occupation, for the succeeding pastor.

Camp Meeting and Conference Entertainment

Ministers of this Conference may obtain their meals in the Conference Cafeteria during camp meeting and conference sessions by paying \$11.50 per person per year. The wife or husband of the minister shall be granted the same privilege of this rate. Their children (those under 19 years of age and who are dependent upon their parents for support) may enjoy the same privilege of obtaining meals upon payment of \$8.50 for each child. The first meal served under this plan will be the opening day of camp meeting.

Ministers attending a part of the camp meeting and conference session shall not be required to pay the sum of \$11.50, but must pay the full price for each individual meal served them by the cafeteria.

Ministers upon admission into this conference as members shall pay \$7.50 for meals served them by the cafeteria, and their meals will begin at 12 o'clock noon on the opening day of the conference session. Authorized delegates may pay \$8.50 for meals which begin at 12 o'clock on Thursday before the session of the biennial conference.

Authorized delegates may pay \$6.00 for cafeteria service and their meals will begin at 12 o'clock noon on Friday before the session of the Promotional Conference.

All auxiliary organizations of the Pentecostal Holiness Church using the North Carolina Conference facilities at Falcon, shall be responsible for any and all breakage of and damage to said facilities. Also, they are required to pay for gas and electricity used in their conventions and authorized meetings.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

DECORUM COMMITTEE REPORT

We, your Committee on Decorum, recommend these rules of procedure to be observed for the transaction of business in the 1972 session of the conference:

1. Business procedure be based on Robert's Rules of Order, with special attention given to the following:

- a. Any person wishing to speak to the conference for any reason, shall first rise when no one else is speaking, address the chair, and wait until he has been properly recognized.
- b. When a question is under debate, the chair shall endeavor to give equal opportunity to both the affirmative and negative

speakers. All speakers in debate shall be limited to three minutes for any one speech, and no one shall be permitted to speak more than twice, when others, desiring to speak on the same question, have not had the opportunity.

c. A timekeeper shall be elected.

d. We recommend that no member leave the conference bar while conference is in session, without permission from the chair.

2. The bar of the conference shall include the rostrum, and extend across the auditorium from the rostrum back to the center isle.

3. Oral reports, except those of the Conference Board, Christian Education Director, Director of Evangelism and the Conference Woman's Auxiliary President, shall be omitted. The reports shall be limited to three minutes, except for the conference superintendent and treasurer. Written reports of ministers and churches shall be sufficient.

4. All resolutions presented on the floor shall either be included in the report of the committee on resolutions, or shall be signed by a number of conference members equivalent to the number of persons on said committee, (7).

5. Each minister who has not complied with the financial arrangements of the conference shall be referred to the conference board, and the board shall require him or her to make satisfactory arrangements before his or her character is passed.

6. The conference officials shall be nominated from the floor and elected by ballot.

a. In electing a person to a single office, if there is no election on the first ballot, the two with the highest votes shall be run on the second ballot. In the event there is a tie on the second ballot, the conference shall give a deciding vote by standing.

b. In electing the board members, if there is no election on the first ballot, the six receiving the most votes shall be run on a second ballot. If one is elected on the first ballot, only five shall be run on the second ballot. If two are elected on the first ballot, only four shall be run on the second ballot. In event of a third ballot, a plurality shall constitute an election.

c. The motion to close nominations shall in no case be entertained.

d. In the election of delegates to the General Conference, nominations shall be made from the floor in one session and election shall be in a later session. Mimeographed copies of all persons nominated, both ministerial and lay, shall be furnished to all conference members, and this copy shall constitute a ballot for this election. Those receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected, and those receiving the next highest number of votes shall be the alternates. In case of a tie, the conference to decide who shall be elected by a standing vote.

7. If a person who has been elected a member of another board shall be elected to the conference board, he shall decide upon which board he prefers to serve and shall resign from the other board

immediately, and the conference shall elect a successor to serve out the unexpired term of the resigned member.

8. All committee reports, except that of the Stationing Committee, shall be distributed at the first session of the conference.

9. The Stationing Committee report shall be read on Sunday afternoon at the close of the World Mission Service, and shall be the final item of business.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

We, your Committee on Resolutions submit the following:

1. Each church shall mail quarterly reports to the conference office within ten days after the end of each quarter, namely: March 31, June 30, and September 30. The annual report for the year ending December 31 shall be in the office by January 10.

2. Each church shall be encouraged to set a travel allowance of 10¢ per mile for its pastor when he is traveling in connection with the church work.

3. The 1973 and 1974 Falcon Camp Meeting shall begin on the third Sunday of June and continue through the fourth Sunday. A service by the Falcon Children's Home shall be included in the program.

4. The 1973 Promotional Conference shall convene on Saturday, June 23, at 9:00 a. m., and the 1974 Biennial Conference shall convene on Friday before the fourth Sunday in June at 9:00 a. m.

5. That the conference give the Expansion Study Commission and conference board a rising vote of appreciation for the improvements of the conference property.

6. The conference board shall be responsible for the selection of camp meeting preachers for 1973 and 1974.

7. The report of the 1970 Study Commission for Pastoral Voting shall be presented under miscellaneous business at this conference.

8. That the 1974 Stationing Committee consist of 9 men, one from each district. These are to be nominated by the nominating committee.

9. That the five ministers and five laymen receiving the highest number of votes to the General Conference along with the superintendent comprise a committee to receive and present resolutions to the 1973 Promotional Conference, and General Conference.

10. Churches are encouraged to pay the insurance premiums for their pastor. The conference board pay the premium for the superintendent and the Christian Education Board pay same for the Christian Education Director.

11. That a committee of three laymen and three ministers be appointed by the conference board to review and study the feasibility of reducing the present church allocation to the conference, and present it to the 1974 Biennial Conference.

12. Churches shall vote for pastor on the fourth Sunday in May preceding the Biennial Conference: All absentee ballots shall be sealed and signed by the eligible voter on the outside of the envelope. Results of the voting shall be forwarded to the conference superintendent within 24 hours.

13. It be deemed feasible to re-appoint to the current pastorate a minister who has the favorable vote and declares to the stationing committee his desire to return to his pastorate:

a. Two-thirds majority of those voting for pastor shall be considered a favorable vote.

b. Ministers shall be informed of their appointments during consultation with the stationing committee, and if afterwards a re-adjustment has to be made, the committee shall grant the minister another consultation.

14. Ministers and delegates shall take these committee reports home with them and present them to the church board to use at their first board meeting.

15. The Nominating Committee consisting of nine men shall be elected to serve with the conference superintendent in selecting the necessary committeemen for the 1974 Biennial Conference. One shall be elected from each district during the final round of the district conferences in 1974.

16. The names and addresses of mission workers shall be recorded in the minutes.

17. A complete roster of local churches with complete addresses, including rural routes, highway numbers, zip codes and telephone numbers be published in the minutes.

18. Each church shall be encouraged to set up a General Conference Expense Fund for the purpose of providing an expense paid trip for its pastor to the General Conference.

19. The dates for the 1973-74 Christian Worker's Institute be set by the conference board. We urge all our ministers to attend.

20. All licensed ministers who are engaged in the full-time ministry, pursue the course of study leading to their ordination.

21. Since full time ministers have no retirement benefits, we recommend that their social security payments be made by the local church.

22. The Evangel published monthly the name, addresses and telephone numbers of ministers available for week-end revivals, or for substituting in the absence of pastors.

23. We suggest that every church form a Men's Fellowship. The conference board plan for a conference-wide organizational meeting at the 1973 Promotional Conference.

a. The date and format shall be under the direct supervision of the conference board.

b. The North Carolina Delegation to the 1973 General Conference petition the General Conference to organize a General Men's Fellowship, and the organization be declared an auxiliary of the church.

24. In the event of death of one of our ministers, the superintendent's office shall contact the district conference secretaries, and they in turn will notify the ministers of the district.

25. No person other than duly elected church delegates shall consult with the stationing committee concerning pastoral assignments unless the pastor and delegates involved are invited to attend the meeting.

26. Those men who served with the conference board on the Expansion Study Commission be re-appointed to serve on the building committee for the next biennium. Duties of the committee shall be:

- a. Continue and complete the approved renovations of the white dormitory.
- b. Study the needs for and propose all new building projects for the conference.
- c. Secure the estimate of cost and present the plans and estimate to the conference.
- d. Carry out approved action by the conference.
- e. Report on their work to the next Promotional or Biennial Conference, including the cost.

27. An editing committee comprised of the conference superintendent, secretary, and the chairman of Evangelism, Finance and Resolution Committee review all committee reports and edit them to provide consistent form and structure.

28. The Stationing Committee report shall be read on Sunday afternoon following the World Missions Service, and there shall be no night service.

29. All dates in the By-laws be changed to conform to the new fiscal year.

30. The By-laws of the conference to be carried over into the next biennium. (Please read them.)

31. The conference board study the feasibility of providing an automobile for the superintendent, and after investigation with an attorney, if it be found feasible, that they implement the matter immediately.

32. That as far as possible, no person in the local church serve on more than one board at the same time.

33. The conference board and various auxiliary heads serve as a planning committee for the 1973 Promotional and 1974 Biennial Conference.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Holy Scriptures associate closely spirituality and liberality. Therefore we beseech our people to support our denominational, conference and church programs financially. Each pastor is encouraged to preach at least two stewardship messages yearly.

1. Churches and ministers shall be diligent in complying with the By-laws related to conference financial responsibilities passed by the conference.

2. In keeping with the General Conference Minutes of 1969, the Conference Board shall review and adjust the salary of the conference superintendent and all personnel employed by the conference. The rate of 10 cents per mile shall be paid for official travel. This rate of mileage payment is to apply in all other facets of official travel as well.

3. Recognizing that the Sunday School personnel cannot effectively teach that which they do not practice, each member of the Sunday School staff must pay tithes into the local church, and any person holding any other official position in the local church must pay tithes into the local treasury.

4. In order that the evangelistic program in the local churches shall not be hindered, we feel that the time has come to recommend

that the official boards of all local churches take the necessary steps to see that our evangelists are properly compensated.

- a. Full-time churches employing full-time evangelists shall not pay less than \$160.00 per week, and where possible shall give consideration for travel.
 - b. Smaller churches shall consider \$125.00 per week a minimum salary, and where possible shall give consideration for travel expenses.
 - c. Eleven day revivals (Thursday through Sunday week) shall be considered two full weeks in terms of compensating evangelists.
5. Ministers of the conference are strongly encouraged to participate in the General Superannuate Program.
6. If a church cancels a revival for a full-time evangelist without giving at least 30 days' notice, that church shall pay the amount of money agreed upon for such evangelist.
7. The local church board shall consider at least a week's salary as a proper Christmas gift to the pastor, and the pastor's family shall be given consideration, as well.
8. The following appropriations be made for this conference year.
- a. 16% for Conference Evangelism.
 - b. 1% for General Superannuation.
 - c. 25% for Conference Superannuation.
 - d. 4% for Christian Education.
 - (1) All funds received into the Sunday School and Youth treasuries in addition to the 4% shall comprise a fund for Christian Education.
 - (2) The Christian Education Board shall designate a person from said board to serve as treasurer of this fund.
 - e. 54% Conference Administration (Including the building fund).
9. The following appropriations for this sitting of the conference:

10. We recommend that the Woman's Auxiliary be permitted to make the presentation of the appropriations to the colleges at the Feast of Ingathering.
11. Since there is a need for on-the-field training for our ministerial students we recommend the following:
- a. Pastors secure ministerial students to serve Pastoral Internship with them during the summer.
 - b. That the conference supplement the church that participates in this program \$200.00 from the administration fund if called for.
 - c. The program must run as much as eight weeks for the church to be eligible for supplement.
 - d. The Conference Board be responsible to make available a list of ministerial students and that during this conference year a

workshop be held to give information for the promotion of said project.

12. Each pastor securing 10 or more subscriptions to the Conference **Evangel** shall receive it free.

13. That all salaries and benefits including mileage received by conference personnel be included in the treasurer's report.

WORLD MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Divine Mandate given by Christ, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," reminds us of the historic mission of the church and the reason for its existence. The task is yet unfinished because there are more people who have not received the gospel message in our world today than at any other time in history. These millions of souls and the ever-imminent return of Christ demand that we display extraordinary vision, dedication, and sacrifice in the performance of our duties.

In view of these urgent circumstances, we, your Committee on World Missions, submit the following recommendations:

1. That a member of the conference board be appointed as Conference Mission Director at the first conference board meeting following the biennial conference.

2. The Conference Missions Director, in cooperation with the conference superintendent, strive to lead the conference into a consciousness of the needs of World Missions.

a. A pastor or layman be appointed as District Director of each district at the first board meeting following the biennial conference.

b. The Conference Missions Director meet with the District Appointees and correlate the Conference Missions Program in relation to the General Missions Program at least every six months.

c. The District Director arrange a special Missions Rally in his or her district for each church or group of churches, during the biennium, with at least one district rally per year.

3. All offerings received at rallies, conventions, etc. be sent to the conference treasurer and all expenses connected with the missions program be paid by the conference.

4. Pastors and churches cooperate with the conference missions program by inviting rallies to be held in their churches and areas.

5. We urge our churches and pastors to cooperate in paying ten per cent of funds to the general budget as stipulated by the general conference, and beyond this to engage in special missionary and other field projects.

6. We recommend that the Annual Mission Emphasis for the Falcon Camp Meeting be continued and that the churches strive to raise one dollar per member.

7. That during the last round of District Conferences the District Mission Director be given time for the promotion of the Annual Mission Emphasis.

8. We express our appreciation and commendation for the support given our World Missions Program during the past years by both pastors and churches.

EDUCATION AND PUBLICATION REPORT

We, your Committee on Education and Publication, offer these recommendations:

1. The conference conduct a Christian Worker's Institute during 1973 and 1974.

2. The speaker or speakers of the 1973 institute follow the theme of "Bible Prophecy."

3. The 1973 institute include a special workshop on drug addiction, inviting an authority on drugs, symptoms of addiction, and withdrawal.

4. The conference board be responsible for final planning of this and other programs for the 1973-74 institutes.

5. This conference continue support of the educational program adopted by the 1969 session of the General Conference.

6. Each pastor shall conduct a teaching program within his church to assure that each member is fully acquainted with the doctrines, history and procedure of the church.

7. A copy of the **Manual** be given to each new member upon reception into the church.

8. The Conference **Evangel** be continued as the official conference publication at a cost of \$2.00 per year, with the superintendent as editor and business manager.

9. Each church appoint a reporter to send news of local church interest to the **Evangel**.

10. Ministers and churches, embracing all departments are urged to support the conference office book store and Advocate Press to the greatest possible extent in purchasing Sunday School and church literature and supplies.

11. The pastor shall promote and maintain within his church the best possible circulation of our conference and church publications.

12. Four thousand (4,000) copies of the 1972-73 minutes to be published with each related department paying its pro-rated share of cost. Further, a map of the state of North Carolina shall be included in the minutes with the conference boundaries defined.

13. Ministers and churches utilize the communications media; radio, television, newspapers, and attractive identifying outdoor signs.

14. Conference officials be encouraged to utilize these media more to advertise conference activities such as Falcon Camp Meeting, Christian Worker's Institute, etc. Purchase a half page in the Raleigh **News and Observer**, and have a banner placed on the present sign advertising the camp meeting.

15. The official board make available General Conference and North Carolina Conference Denominational publications to the public and college libraries within the conference geographical area.

16. Each church contribute a gift subscription to the **Evangel**,

to its college students and service men. The **Evangel** be made available to superannuated ministers.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We, your Committee on Christian Education, recommend:

1. A full-time Director of Christian Education shall be appointed by the stationing committee during this session of the conference. His duties to be defined by the Christian Education Board.
2. When the director visits a church for the purpose of promoting Christian Education in the Lifeliners and Sunday School, the church visited shall recognize its financial responsibility for expenses entailed by the visit. All monies received on such visits, above \$25.00, shall be applied on his salary.
3. Utilities and housing for the director shall be paid by the Christian Education Department.
 - a. The director's salary shall be reviewed by the Christian Education Board at least once a year and increases in salary shall be granted in keeping with the diligence, merit, and progress of the department, salary increases shall be subject to approval by the conference board.
 - b. The director shall be granted a two-weeks vacation each year.
4. The Christian Education Board shall determine the salary of the department secretary-treasurer.
5. The director shall be allowed to conduct three one-week revivals each year. All monies received for such services are not to be applied on his salary.
6. The department shall sponsor a candy sale in November of 1972 and 1973.
7. The Christian Education Promotional Convention shall convene on Tuesday prior to the North Carolina Promotional Conference and necessary plans shall be formulated by the Christian Education Department.
8. The Biennial Sunday School Convention shall be held on Friday one week prior to the North Carolina Biennial Conference. The Biennial Lifeliners Convention shall be held on Saturday one week prior to the Biennial Conference.
9. The Christian Education Board shall be granted permission to study the feasibility of installing a swimming pool for the youth camps.
 - a. The study shall be reported to the 1973 Promotional Conference.
 - b. If support and sentiment are proved to be favorable, the Christian Education Board shall be authorized to proceed with the installation provided the means for its construction can be drawn from sources other than the general operating fund.
10. The minutes of the Sunday School and Lifeliners Conventions shall be approved by this conference, after adjustments necessary to legal procedure in election.

11. One issue of the **Evangel** be devoted largely to activities, rallies, youth camp, etc.

EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

One of the imperatives included in the directives of our Lord Jesus Christ to His church is the winning of lost souls. The missionary, Paul the apostle, realizing the divine authority of this charge, emphasized this mandate to Timothy and all who would succeed him in evangelistic pursuits. He said, "Do the work of an evangelist." It is with these facts in mind that we submit this report.

1. A director of Evangelism shall be appointed by the Division of Labor at this sitting of the conference.

a. He shall be assigned as pastor of one of the sponsored churches under the evangelism program.

b. The salary and all other benefits of the director shall be determined by the Evangelism Board with the conference superintendent serving as chairman.

2. His duties shall be:

a. To correlate and promote the evangelism program adopted by this session of the conference.

b. To investigate new fields and promote revival efforts toward establishing churches where there is sufficient potential.

c. A listing of all ministers and students who are available for revivals and/or pastoral substitutions shall be published periodically in the Conference **Evangel**.

d. He shall be amenable to the Evangelism Board and its chairman in making monthly reports as to the work and progress of the over-all program.

3. The Evangelism Department shall continue with the Mobile Unit method of new field work and its subsidizing of full-time pastors in small churches and shall serve as a study commission to determine the churches with potential.

4. Full-time, experienced ministers shall be appointed by the Division of labor at this session to serve as pastors of the mobile chapels and sponsored churches. They shall be amenable to the Evangelism Board.

5. The Evangelism Board shall study the ability of the churches selected for supplement to provide housing, utilities, social security, etc., and pay a minister's salary. Then the Evangelism Board shall supplement the salary of each pastor involved to a minimum of \$110.00 per week. The amount of each pastoral supplement shall remain the same for a two year period.

6. The Evangelism Board shall appropriate such financial assistance to pastors, evangelists and new churches as is deemed necessary and possible.

7. April shall be designated as **SIMULTANEOUS REVIVAL MONTH**, and a unified conference campaign shall be effected.

a. The theme of such campaign, poster boards, publicity materials, etc., shall be determined by the Evangelism Board.

- b. Evangelism shall be emphasized at all services and every church will be expected to have a revival during the month of April.
- c. Each church will be expected to mail a report to the Evangelism Director following the campaign. This report shall state the attendance, number of conversions, and church membership increases.

8. Conference-appointed evangelists, whose majority support is derived from full-time evangelistic endeavor within the bounds of the conference will be supplemented \$150.00 at Christmas; \$150.00 at Christian Worker's Institute and \$150.00 at conference session. They, of course, must attend the institute, camp meeting and conference session.

9. The Evangelism Department shall consist of nine (9) District Units.

- a. Each unit shall consist of a committee of three persons: a director appointed by the Division of Labor; a secretary-treasurer, and a layman to serve in an advisory capacity shall be elected at the first round of the district conferences.
- b. The district committee will meet at least once a quarter and otherwise as is necessary to promote a progressive evangelism program.
- c. The nine district directors, along with the conference director will comprise the Evangelism Board; the conference superintendent will serve as chairman.
- d. In view of the fact that the conference now has adequate facilities to accommodate conference related activities, we recommend that the Evangelism Board plan one conference-wide evangelism rally during the last week of March.
- e. Each district will aim to establish one new church each biennium.
- f. Each district unit will survey the needs, and do something to help the smaller churches within its bounds, such as:
 - (1) Lend members.
 - (2) Supplement evangelists.
 - (3) Subsidize full-time pastors.
 - (4) Sponsor building programs.
 - (5) Urge consolidation where it is feasible.
 - (6) Help relocate church sites.
- g. Local churches shall be encouraged to conduct a revival in small churches assuming responsibility for all expenses involved such as evangelist's salary, publicity, etc. Further, the sponsoring church shall encourage and furnish special singing, altar workers and all other encouragement necessary for a successful revival.
- h. Each district unit shall sponsor a district revival during the biennium.
- i. The Evangelism Board study the feasibility of an annual Conference-wide Evangelism Convention. Persons whose success qualify them be secured as speakers. All conference departments shall be invited to participate.
- j. Each district shall encourage all the churches in its area to sponsor weekly prayer meetings under the direction of local

pastor and board with shut-ins, nursing homes, jails, etc., using mission workers if possible.

k. Ten cents per mile shall be paid the Conference Evangelism Committee (unit) when traveling in behalf of evangelism.

10. The Evangelism Director shall make available to all pastors a list of ministerial students who would be available during the summer months for youth revivals, Vacation Bible Schools, or student pastoral training.

11. The Evangelism Board continue an Evangelistic Emphasis Club.

1. We express our appreciation to the staff of the Home for their faithful and untiring service.

2. We urge the support through daily prayer and planned cooperation in the Children's Home program.

3. Each pastor and church official board shall acquaint themselves and congregations with the various ways of support now available, namely:

- a. Harvest Train
- b. The \$12.00 per Year Club
- c. Memorials
- d. Allowance Club
- e. Sponsor Plan
- f. Coupons and Stamps
- g. Foster Home Plan

4. A section be provided in the Conference **Evangel** when requested to spotlight some phase of the Home. That special emphasis for the Harvest Train in the October issue 1972-73 be continued.

5. Members of our church and other friends of the Home should be encouraged to consider perpetuating a lasting memorial gift, such as including the Home in a will or make the Home beneficiary in insurance policies.

6. Each pastor and church shall cooperate with the North Carolina Conference Woman's Auxiliary and other church auxiliaries in promoting a drive for Gold Bond Stamps. (project to be decided).

7. One Sunday in each quarter shall be designated as Children's Home Emphasis Sunday.

a. The church or pastor shall appoint someone who will briefly present current information relating to some special phase of the Children's Home. The **Guardian** is one source of material.

b. Packets of material and other information are available upon request.

8. Inasmuch as the general budget appropriation meets less than 50% of the operating budget, each pastor and church are strongly urged to:

- a. Remember the Home in their annual budget appropriations.
 - b. Invite the concert group on a freewill offering basis throughout the biennium.
 - c. Make purposeful plans to assure successful promotion of the annual Harvest Train on Tuesday, November 21, 1972 and Tuesday 20, 1973.
9. Each local church and pastor, as opportunity affords, shall feel free to visit the Home and acquaint themselves with its operation.
10. Churches of the conference and especially those of the Fayetteville District, shall include in their program of benevolence some form of visitation and Christian service to the Golden Year's Home.

RESOLUTION TO THE CONSTITUTION ON SUPERANNUATION

Any minister leaving or being dismissed from the North Carolina Conference shall upon request, be refunded the amount he has paid into this fund, without interest. Such request must be made within sixty days.

However, any minister having served ten or more years desiring to leave the North Carolina Conference to do work in another Conference within the Pentecostal Holiness Church shall upon his request have his Superannuation benefits frozen. These accrued benefits shall be paid to him upon his retirement in the same manner as those who serve in the North Carolina Conference until retirement.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY REPORT

We, your Committee on Woman's Auxiliary, recommend the following:

1. The minutes of the Woman's Auxiliary Convention shall be approved by this conference.
2. Officials shall be paid 10¢ per mile when traveling in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary.
3. The Woman's Auxiliary Convention be held on Wednesday of the week of the camp meeting.
4. The pastor of a church which does not have an auxiliary, shall invite the conference president to visit that church for the purpose of organizing an auxiliary.
5. The pastor of each church encourage their auxiliary to cooperate with the Conference and General Woman's Auxiliary program.
6. The church, Sunday School and Lifeliners shall cooperate with the auxiliary in promoting the Falcon Children's Home Harvest Train on Tuesday before Thanksgiving.
7. All pastors encourage the Sunday School and Lifeliners to cooperate with the auxiliary in promoting the Feast of Ingathering and keep our church schools before the youth.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

We, your Committee on Resolutions, recommend the following:

1. We recommend to the convention the continuation of full-time Director of Christian Education.

2. That the Director of Christian Education who is appointed by the Conference serve as President of the Sunday School Association and that this Convention elect a Vice President, a Secretary-Treasurer and one board member.

3. That the Christian Education Board continue to employ secretarial help to take care of the stenographic work of the Christian Education Board.

4. That the Sunday School year coincide with the Conference year, January 1 through December 31.

5. That the Annual Conference continue the consolidation of the Sunday School and the Youth Boards into a Christian Education Board to function as the Christian Education Department.

6. That the Sunday School and Lifeliners Conventions be combined in the Promotional Conference and be called the Christian Education Convention and that the Christian Education Board work out details of the 1974 Sunday School Convention.

7. That North Carolina Sunday Schools adopt National Standard of Achievements and that each Sunday School work toward Standardization as outlined in NSA Booklet, "They That Be Wise Standardize" and the Sunday Schools be graded according to the National Standard of Achievement.

8. That each Sunday School teach at least one unit of Teacher Training Course each year to Sunday School staff and potential leadership.

9. That the Director of Christian Education at least once each quarter furnish each pastor a newsletter stating statistics in relation to our Conference Sunday Schools.

10. That the Annual Rally and District Rallies be worked out by the Christian Education Board.

11. That the Sunday School Convention Minutes be inserted in the Conference Minutes, and that the Sunday School Department pay its pro-rata part of the cost of said Minutes to the North Carolina Conference Treasury.

12. That the Christian Education Department continue the scholarship fund for worthy boys and girls from the North Carolina Conference who plan to attend Emmanuel College, Holmes Theological Seminary or Southwestern Bible College. That earmarked funds from individuals or churches may be placed in this fund.

13. That all revisions of rolls be done once a year under the direct supervision of the Sunday School Superintendent and Pastor according to the NSA Booklet, and no name shall be marked off without the consent of the Pastor. The suggested time is the first Sunday of October. This deals only as to whether a person is active or inactive.

14. That we follow the calendar year of the National Sunday School Association.

15. That Promotion Day be the last Sunday of September.

16. That the new year for all Sunday Schools begin October 1st or the first Sunday. This deals with the junctions of Sunday School.

17. That each church promote a Vacation Bible School in the coming year.

18. That a letter be sent to all churches once a quarter if they fail to pay their tithes into the Christian Education Department.

19. Our National Standard calls for a mission offering each month. In view of the fact that our Conference is Mission minded we therefore, would like to join hands with them in the effort. Each Sunday School will receive and send through its Sunday School Treasurer each month to the Christian Education Department their offering designated for missions. At the end of the year proper records will be kept notifying each church of the amount they have paid Missions. That all money received by the Christian Education Department for Missions be given directly to the Conference.

20. Recognizing that our Sunday School personnel cannot effectively teach that which they do not practice, we recommend that each Sunday School staff member pay tithes to the church and that they loyally support the church services with regular attendance, such as the prayer meetings and revival services, as well as the Sunday services.

21. We suggest material for Vacation Bible School, Sunday School material (promotional) commentaries, etc. be purchased from our Book Room. That each Pastor take the initiative to encourage their church to patronize the Office Book Room. This will strengthen our Christian Education Department and Conference.

3. The Christian Education Board shall devise a plan that permits the North Carolina Conference Youth to have a voice in planning specific youth programs.

4. The Lifeliners Convention year shall coincide with the North Carolina Conference year.

5. The 1973 C. E. Convention and the 1974 Biennial Convention shall be held during the Falcon Camp Meeting on a date set by the Christian Education Board. The program shall be planned by the Christian Education Board.

6. The Christian Education Board shall plan the Youth Camps for the Biennium using as many weeks as seems practical and these camps shall be under the direct supervision of the Christian Education Board.

7. Each local Lifeliners is encouraged to promote a Youth Revival during the year of 1973 in cooperation with the local official board.

8. Each local Lifeliners shall promote a high level of Christian consecration among the young people and our youth shall be placed in the function of the local church program when it is practical.

9. Each pastor and local congregation shall take the initiative to provide wholesome, supervised recreation for our Lifeliners.

10. A Falcon Youth Camp Scholarship Candy Sale shall be conducted in November of 1972 and 1973 and awarded on the basis of the amount of candy sold.

11. That a better understanding and a greater spirit of cooperation be attained, each pastor shall be extended an invitation to the 1973 and 1974 Falcon Youth Camp.

12. Due to the need of Christian guidance, we urge our ministers and laymen to cooperate with the Christian Education Board by serving whenever needed as Youth Camp Workers.

13. Since our Youth Camps are dedicated to the upbuilding of our youth spiritually, we recommend that the local church raise funds to send their Youth who cannot afford the tuition.

14. The North Carolina Conferences Lifeliners Department shall continue to emphasize Youth Evangelism and Witnessing Teams and the Christian Education Board shall sponsor Youth Teams when it is feasible.

15. Each local Lifeliners Department shall subscribe to the magazine **REACH** and the Lifeliners material for Juniors and Youth.

16. Each local Lifeliners Department is encouraged to use our conference Book Room to obtain program materials and promotional materials when it is possible.

YOUTH AND CHRISTIAN MORALS COMMITTEE REPORT

We believe that Christian morals given to us by the Holy Scriptures and founding fathers of our Church should be maintained. These principles of Bible Holiness were the torch which lighted the path a generation ago, and we shall strive to uphold and be true to them.

With Christ as our example, we, your Committee on Youth and Christian Morals, submit the following:

1. Inasmuch as the home is the foundation of any nation, it is urged that we, the Youth, take active part in daily family worship and daily Bible reading.

2. Being aware of the growing laxity and irreverence in worship service, we stress the importance of setting the example for other

young people by regular attendance of all church services, district rallies and conference activities.

3. That a special effort be made by each Lifeliners Board to build a library of good, clean, wholesome books which will be available on a loan basis to all Lifeliners.

4. Because we are living in the days of increasing evils and modern-day crime, we urge our Youth leaders and pastors to be frank and very tactful in pointing out ensnaring sins of today such as ungodly radio and television programs, indecent literature and entertainment, improper dress and anything which is calculated to destroy or impede our spirituality and/or Christian influence.

5. That local Lifeliners programs be designed to promote Godliness and spirituality and not for the purpose of mere entertainment. We recommend that the local Lifeliners programs for the year include the following:

8. We urge that a definite stand be taken against all alcoholic beverages, tobacco, narcotics or anything else harmful to the body.

9. That we refrain from attending places of amusement that place us in an unholy atmosphere.

10. That we strive to exemplify Philippians 4:8 which reads, "whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things."

11. Christian morals are not confined to the above mentioned ideals alone; therefore, let us earnestly strive for the highest standard of living and personal individual convictions, patterned after the nature of God and His Holy Word.

12. That all Lifeliners Directors, Pastors, and Teachers bring these matters relating to Christian morals REPEATEDLY, and with EMPHASIS, before our Youth on their age level.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, recommend that we, as a Convention, adopt the General W. A. Convention Theme: FOLLOWING ON TO KNOW . . . HIS PATTERN for the Church (1973).

1. That a Woman's Auxiliary be organized in each church.

2. That the North Carolina Conference stress the importance of local churches complying with W. A. Convention rules, article 3, item 4, or W. A. Constitution: "No organization of any Pentecostal Holiness Church shall function under the name of Woman's Auxiliary unless it complies with the Constitution and By-laws of the Woman's Auxiliary."

3. That the Conference President in organizing any Auxiliary, be authorized to give the President a **Manual**, Secretary Record Book, Report Blank Book and a year's subscription each to the **Evangel and Helping Hand**.

4. That the local W. A. officials acquaint themselves with the W. A. **Manual** and convention minutes and that the first meeting after the convention be given to the study of the convention committee reports; that the W. A. consider a Post Convention Council to acquaint the women with the decisions of W. A. Convention and launch plans for the new fiscal year.

5. That each president stress the importance of the Ten-Point Standard in the W. A. **Manual**.

6. That the W. A. secretary send quarterly W. A. reports to the Conference W. A. President and Secretary; close the books December 31, and mail annual report by January 10 to both the Conference President and Secretary.

a. That each Auxiliary use official secretary record book and report blank book which can be obtained from the Office Book Room.

b. That each Secretary furnish the church Secretary quarterly and annual W. A. reports.

7. That each Auxiliary annually invite the Conference President, a W. A. Board Member or a District Director for a special program.

8. That each Auxiliary sponsor a reception for incoming pastor and

that outgoing pastor be rememberd in some special way.

9. That the 1973-74 conventions meet first Thursday of Falcon Camp Meeting.

10. That N. C. W. A. Board be authorized to appoint committee personnel for the 1973-74 W. A. Conventions.

11. That the pre-convention Planning Committee meet the day before the convention.

12. That the delegates for the General Convention in Roanoke, Virginia, be comprised of the three board members and the other eight (8) delegates be divided between lay women and ministers' wives, four lay women and four ministers' wives.

13. That the Conference President's report be placed in the minutes with today's program.

14. That the N. C. Conference Board be requested to approve 1972-74 officials immediately and that these officers take office Friday, July 28, 1972. The Secretary-treasurer to have 30 days to close books.

15. That we have a historian appointed by the W. A. Conference Board.

16. That the Circle Plan be adopted in each local Auxiliary with 30 or more members where feasible.

17. That we lend our support and Christian influence to such community activities as W. C. T. U., the P. T. A., and all other worthwhile organizations.

18. That we encourage our conference women to participate in the P. F. N. A. Day of Prayer.

19. That the Conference W. A. Board Continue to Participate in "Sharing Sister Program" and they study the feasibility of beginning a similar program for the local W. A.'s.

20. That we endorse paragraph 3 of the General W. A. Convention Resolution Committee Report: "That the W. A. General Board implement various facets of leadership training programs and that such programs be promoted by Regional Directors, Conferences and Local Presidents."

21. In the event a vacancy occurs on the Conference W. A. Board said Board shall appoint a person to serve until the biennial election of officers.

22. That the second Sunday in March continue to be observed as W. A. Day in the local church and that we use the program planned by the General W. A. Board.

23. That the N. C. W. A. Board plan an annual G. A. Convention and that each local W. A. encourage girls to attend.

24. That District Directors be appointed by the board and board members serve in this capacity when absolutely necessary.

4. We suggest that each auxiliary participating in the sponsor plan invite their child for a visit during the year.

8. That each local W. A. cooperate in planning and promoting Vacation Bible School and encourage young people to attend Youth Camp.

9. That we encourage people to place a memorial book in our church school libraries in memory of a deceased loved one or friend.

10. That we conduct study courses each year for the purpose of training and promoting leadership. (Courses may be based on W. A. **Manual** and/or study books recommended by the General W. A.)

11. That we contact, promote, and encourage our Pentecostal youth organizations in our colleges and universities.

12. We recommend that the W. A. Board investigate the feasibility of having area retreats in our conference to give workshops to help us as women to be able to communicate with our youth concerning drugs, sex, pressures at school, etc.
