THE CONSTITUTION
SANDY RUN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Subject to Adoption October 17, 1956

Article I — Name

This body shall be known as the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

Article II — Membership

Sec. 1. The Association shall be composed of Baptist Churches of Rutherford County, Cleveland County and Polk County which are now members, and any other Baptist churches which may hereafter be admitted as provided.

Sec. 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented by her pastor and two representatives. Any church with more than fifty members shall be entitled to a messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. New churches may be admitted by a majority vote of messengers present after careful examination and found to be regular in their organization, orthodox in their doctrine, and supporting objects of the Association, State, and Southern Baptist Conventions. Churches are to be accepted under watchcare of the Association for a period of one year in order that the above may be determined.

Sec. 4. The Association may at any time dissolve connection with any church that becomes heterodox in doctrine or disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Sec. 5. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure.

Sec. 6. In case of internal dissention in a church and two parties coming up to the Association, each claiming to represent the church; neither party shall be seated as messengers until the question is decided as to which party is the church in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of messengers present.

Article III — Objects

The objects of the Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence, and spiritual power of the churches and to direct, promote, and develop their energies in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially

along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the State Baptist Convention, and the Association itself.

Article IV - Meetings

Sec. 1 The Association shall meet in annual session on Tuesday and Wednesday after the Second Sunday in October of each year. The Moderator shall call the body to meet in extra session if necessity shall arise.

Sec. 2 The Associational year shall begin October 1 of each year and close September 30 of the following year.

Article V - Officers and Duties

Sec. 1. The officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, and leaders of the organized work in the Association, who shall be chosen annually by a majority present.

Sec. 2. The officers shall perform all duties usually devolving upon such offices in well deliberative assemblies.

Sec. 3. The term of Moderator shall not exceed more than two consecutive years.

Sec. 4. The Missionary of the Sandy Run Baptist Association shall work with and assist the churches and missions of the Association in the promotion of their work and shall be under the supervision of the Associational Board.

Article VI - Associational Board

Sec. 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of the officers of the Association (Article V, Sec. 1) who shall also be the officers of this Board with the Moderator as chairman, the leader of each of the Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music,) the Associational Missionary (ex-officio), the Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative on the Baptist State Convention General Board, each active pastor, and two members selected by each active church of the Association.

Sec. 2. This body shall act for the Association in the interim between annual sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, neither taking any action contrary to the will of the Association, nor initiating any new policy or practice binding upon the Association unless specifically so directed. However, in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action so taken shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for its consideration.

Sec. 3. The Board shall be divided into committees with assigned duties (Article VII, Sec. 1.)

Sec. 4. The Clerk will make a report to the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 5. This body shall meet on Monday following the first Sunday in each quarter. The place may be decided.

Article VII - Committees and Their Duties

Sec. 1. ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD COMMITTEES. The Associational Board shall be divided into the following committees and duties:

- (1) To study and act upon any matters of business of the Associational Board between quarterly meetings of the Board. Any action taken shall be dependent upon the approval of the Associational Board.
- (2) To counsel and advise any committee or church in the Association on any suggestion that may be submitted to it.
- (3) To counsel, advise, and direct the Associational Missionary and recommend to the Associational Board any necessary changes in any phase of the work.
- (4) To assist the Associational Missionary in his work and, in event of his resignation, this Committee shall be responsible for finding and recommending a successor to the Associational Board.
- (5) To work with the Associational Missionary in formulating a calendar of activities for the Association.

2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. This Committee and its chairman, consisting of nine members, shall be appointed by the Moderator of the Association soon following the annual session of the Association. It shall, as soon as possible, meet and assign the members of the Associational Board to the various committees, naming the chairman of each except as otherwise provided, and name the Standing Committees and their chairman (Article VII, Sec. 2.) Also, it shall name any other committee assigned to it.

3. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM. This Committee shall be composed of the Associational Chairman of Evangelism and members assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings and organizations of the Association. It shall also encourage and help arrange revivals in every section of the Association and lead in simultaneous revivals. The chairmen will submit a written report to the annual session of the Association.

4. COMMITTEE ON ORDINATIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall serve in an advisory capacity when called upon to assist in the examination and ordination of deacons and candidates for the gospel ministry.

5. COMMITTEE ON LOCATION OF NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. Its duties shall be as follows:

- (1) Receive and consider any request by any group for a mission to be organized into a Baptist church and recommend action to the Associational Board.
- (2) Be alert to develop any load that might be given toward the establishment of a new church or mission. Advise with the group, or groups, involved what steps should be taken in the location and organization of a mission or church.
- (3) Consider applications from any church or churches desiring membership in the Sandy Run Association and make recommendations to the Associational Board as to what action should be taken.

6. COMMITTEE ON FINANCES, BUDGET, AND AUDITING. This Committee shall be composed of the Treasurer as chairman, Moderator, S. S. Supt., T. U. Director, W. M. U. President, Brotherhood President, Church Music Director, and as many other members as the Committee on Committees may deem wise. This Committee shall prepare and recommend a budget for the Associational Program and suggest ways and means to the churches whereby the budget can be raised. It shall also be responsible for auditing the Treasurer's book.

7. COMMITTEE ON FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. The Committee on Committees shall appoint this Committee, naming the chairman, and assign as many members as it deems wise. It shall consider all church or

mission requests for pastoral aid and requests to be made to the State or Home Mission Boards for aid or loans in buying church lots and shall make recommendations concerning them to the Associational Board.

8. **COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.** This Committee and its chairman shall be named by the Committee on Committees. It shall bring a suitable report at the annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches to have died since the last annual session.

9. **COMMITTEES TO REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL WORK.** These are Committees on (1) State Missions, (2) Home Missions, (3) Foreign Missions, (4) Christian Literature, (5) Christian Education, (6) Children's Homes, (7) Homes for the Aging, (8) Baptist Hospital, (9) Relief and Annuity, (10) Temperance and Civic Righteousness, (11) Stewardship and (12) American Bible Society. These Committees and their chairmen, composed of not less than five members, shall be named by the Committee on Committees. Their duties shall be to inform our people about the work they are chosen to represent and lead in promoting it. The chairman of each Committee shall make a brief written report at the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 2. STANDING COMMITTEES. These Committees and their chairmen shall also be appointed by the Committee on Committees at the time the Associational Board Committees are appointed, but they are not necessarily composed of Board members. They shall serve through the annual session of the Association. These Committees are:

1. **TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of five members and shall report at the annual session. It shall state the time of the next annual meeting of the Association (Article IV, Sec. 1) recommend the place or places of the meeting, and recommend the preacher and the alternate.

2. **PROGRAM COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Associational Music Director, Associational Missionary, and host pastor or pastors. It shall prepare a printed program for the annual meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall in the opening of the annual meeting of the Association present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

3. **RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE.** This committee shall be composed of five members. It shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it may deem expedient. Also, resolutions and recommendations presented at the annual session may be referred to this Committee.

4. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE;** This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall contact and nominate to the Associational Board in its last meeting before the annual session of the Association for election all the leaders of Associational Organizations (S. S. , T. U. , W. M. U. , Brotherhood, Music) so these leaders in turn can present their helpers to the Association in annual session for election. The Committee shall also contact and nominate at the annual session of the Association all Associational Officers, (Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian) and the Chairman of Evangelism.

Article VIII - Trustees

Sec. 1. There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer.

Sec. 2. The Trustees and their chairmen shall be appointed annually by the Committee on Committees at the time this Committee appoints the

Associational Board Committees.

Sec. 3. Their duties shall be to hold title to property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association with the Association's fore-knowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution of the Association, and with State laws as they effect the Association.

Article IX

This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers in attendance, provided that notice is given and the proposed amendment is stated during the first day, but no vote shall be taken upon the proposed amendment until the afternoon session of the second day.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with song and prayer.
2. The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association. He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise provided for.
3. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be considered an authority in all cases not provided for in the Rules of Order: "but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the Presiding Officer may use his discretion subject to an appeal to the Association."
4. Brethren invited to sit with us shall have the liberty of discussion, but not of voting.
5. Speakers shall rise and address the Moderator, and shall confine themselves to the subject under discussion. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the Association.
6. No question shall be discussed without a motion thereon first being made and seconded. Motions made and seconded shall be stated by the Moderator previous to any discussion thereon. If motion contains two or more parts, it shall be divided at the request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote of the body.

FIRST DAY

The sixty-eighth annual session of the Sandy Run Association opened at the sound of the gavel in the hand of Moderator, Fred A. Mauney at 9:15 a.m., who declared that all registered messengers, and messengers registering today and tomorrow, be now considered as the Sandy Run Association in annual session for business.

The opening period of worship was conducted by Rev. C. F. High.

Brother M. D. Blanton presented the program for the two day's session and it was dully adopted.

The report on Committee of Committees was then presented by Rev. J. R. Featherston, as follows:

The report of the Executive Committee (Associational Board of the Sandy Run Association) was presented by the clerk of the association and the board, Rev. W. L. McSwain, and was adopted, as follows:

EXECUTIVE BOARD COMMITTEE REPORT

The following is a brief report of some of the most important transactions of the Associational Board during the year.

November 5, 1956

At this first meeting in the Associational year, called by the Moderator, the Board set about organizing itself for work, as authorized by the last session of the association. This body is made up of the officers of the association, all active pastors, the associational missionary, and two

elected members from each of the several churches.

The Moderator stated the purpose and function of the Board: to consider, recommend, or transact such matters of the association as needs immediate attention and to plan for the progress of the work in all its phases.

A committee on committees was appointed to recommend such standing committees as it deemed necessary and appropriate, the report to be made at the next meeting.

It was then decided to hold quarterly meetings at the Florence Baptist Church on the Monday nights after the first Sundays of the quarter, at 7:30 o'clock, at which time reports from the heads of the departments of all our work would be called for. The Treasurer's reports for the four quarters are filed with the clerk.

Applications from four churches for state missions aid were considered and passed upon, and these churches have been aided throughout the year.

January 7, 1957

Brother J. R. Featherstone, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, read his report of recommendations and the following committees were established: Advisory Steering Committee, Committee on Committees, Evangelism, Credentials, Location of New Churches, Finance and Budget, Financial Assistance, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Christian Education, Christian Literature, Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, Hospitals, Relief and Annuity, Temperance and Civic Righteousness, Stewardship, and Memorials. A list of the personnel of these committees was placed in the hands of each member of the Board, and the report was adopted. This list is filed with the clerk.

By common consent the moderator re-enacted the committee for revision of the constitution, the necessity for this having arisen because of the new Associational Board and its functions. The committee consists of Bros. Tom Lawrence, C. E. Auten, and W. V. Carrol (the latter replacing Brother Horton).

January 16, 1957

The Advisory Steering Committee of the Associational Board met on this date for the purpose of considering the resignation of Associational Missionary, Boyd Horton, and for taking necessary steps toward securing a replacement for him, his resignation taking effect February 15. Steps were taken also toward arranging a going-away party in honor of the Horton family.

The Moderator appointed Bros. Tom Lawrence, Fred Bryant, Zeb Moss and J. R. Featherstone to look forward securing an Associational Missionary, the moderator being an ex-officio member of this committee also.

April 18, 1957

At this meeting the actions of the called meeting of the Advisory Steering Committee on January 16 were approved.

The Moderator made a report on efforts to get all of the churches of the Association enlisted in support of the Associational budget. A list of the churches not heard from was read and several of these indicated plans to cooperate.

By action of the Board the committee to secure an associational missionary was empowered to increase our stated salary by three to four hundred dollars, so that it would in keeping with that of other associations and thus enable it to secure a man.

At this meeting Brother J. C. Jackson was elected Associational Brotherhood President, and Brother Marion Packard V. P., in charge of promotion.

July 15, 1957

Brother Tom Lawrence reported for his committee that Brother Van

Carrol had been secured as Associational Missionary, the association to increase his salary by \$300.00 and to bear his moving expenses, house rent, and to provide within the year a more suitable place for him to live.

The Board decided that we would hold to our two days, October 15-16, for the meeting of our association, omitting a night service, and accept the invitation of the Kings Mountain Association to hold a joint session with it at Gardener-Webb College on October 25th.

The Board went on record favoring a request to all of our churches that each one cooperate in the State Convention's Tither's Prove Me Campaign during the last three months of the calendar year.

September 16, 1957

Brother Lawson Allen of Gardner-Webb College spoke at this meeting on a proposed Bible School for our association consisting of courses in Bible Study, Teaching, Public Speaking, Lesson Preparation, Church Finance, etc. The Board sanctioned the idea of such a school and sent a request to the pastor's conference to work out all the necessary details of the school.

Brother Edwin Chenoweth of the associational music department set forth the plans for a music school to be held at the Cliffside Church during September 22-25.

Rev. Earl Bradley of the State Mission Board was present and discussed our Baptist Mission work, and the reports were duly adopted:

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

I. STATE MISSIONS is the missionary effort on the part of North Carolina Baptists to reach the unsaved for Christ and teach, enlist, and train the saved in giving, living, and serving through the churches and throughout the world.

(1) There are 4,300,000 people in the State. About 2,000,000 of these above the age of eight years are affiliated with some kind of church. Of these 1,900,000 above the age of eight years are unchurched. If 25 per cent of the affiliated church members are unsaved, then 62½ per cent of the people of North Carolina above the age of eight years are lost. North Carolina, therefore, is far from being half Christian.

(2) We have over 830,000 Baptist church members in North Carolina. Perhaps 40 percent of these are enlisted and are being taught and trained in Christian giving, living, and serving. This means that 60 per cent of our church membership is not dedicated in the Christian profession. In this undeveloped area, the churches have their primary challenge.

(3) The above interpretation of the purpose and challenge of State Missions demands a varied program of mission activity.

A. Our people need to be taught and trained. Therefore, many of the significant phases of our State Missions' work are promoted through the Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Royal Ambassadors, Church Development, and Music Departments. Over 2,800 Vacation Bible Schools will be reported for 1957 - giving \$50,000 to World Missions. Over 7,000 of our Baptist people attended Training Union weeks at Caswell, Fruitland, and Ridgecrest this summer. Perhaps this is a record attendance. The R. A. camps were full. Many rural churches have been enlisted in our Baptist program of stewardship and organizational life. Many quarter and half-time

churches have been led to activate full-time programs of service. Over 1,300 leaders in the fields of Music and Sunday School attended the assemblies this summer. The programs were promoted and directed by the leadership of these two departments.

B. Over 60 per cent of the people in North Carolina are lost - and need a Saviour. State Missions provides a Department of Evangelism that seeks to inspire pastors and churches to evangelize their communities; also to plan for and promote united evangelistic efforts on a state and associational-wide scale. Since the organization of this Department, baptisms have averaged 8,000 more a year. North Carolina Baptist churches, last year, baptized more people than any other state except Texas.

C. A growing population demands new and stronger churches. State Missions provides a necessary and significant ministry through aid on some church buildings and the purchase of sites for new churches and some one hundred or more salaries for pastors. These supports enable new churches to move forward in a building program and other churches to strengthen their programs and enable the pastors to give more of their time in developing stewardship churches. During the past year, approximately \$150,000 was invested in this work. Six out of every ten Baptist churches in North Carolina have been assisted in one or more ways through this ministry.

D. A more highly developed and intelligent congregation demands a better trained pastor. Pastors' Schools are promoted through State Missions to meet this growing demand. Last year about 180 pastors received better training at Fruitland. Refresher courses were offered at Mars Hill and Wingate Colleges this summer for the benefit of all pastors and their wives trained or untrained. This summer we reached approximately 500 during the Weeks of Christian Study and Fellowship.

E. The colored races in our midst constitute a large percentage of our population. State Missions seeks to minister through a new Department of work with Negroes and Indians. We should do more - not because the Catholics are winning them, but because we should. Ours is the major denomination in North Carolina and, therefore, they are largely our responsibility. Our main emphasis is helping to train their leadership.

F. Other areas of need constantly challenge the resources of State Missions, namely:

(a) The Allied Church League. This organization is doing a tremendous job in helping to produce a sober and sane citizenship in North Carolina.

(b) The Silent People. Three thousand of them beckon for our care, love, and concern.

(c) The Camp and Assembly at Fruitland and Caswell. Our people greatly need the fellowship, inspiration, and training they offer. Perhaps 12,000 attended these assemblies this summer. The organizations of the Woman's Missionary Union had over 2,000 women, men, and young people to attend state and associational W. M. U. camps and mission weeks this summer. They serve all phases of our Baptist work.

(d) Other ministries: Summer Student Work - Student Aid - Ministry Through Service Institutions - Baptist History and Separation of Church and State.

G. The Department of Church Planning. This department serves many churches through counsel and guidance in planning for beautiful and adequate churches and educational buildings.

H. Brotherhood and Royal Ambassador Work are now departments of State Missions. Here we have an unlimited ministry through men and boys.

I. Our church and denominational leaders of tomorrow need to be taught and trained in co-operation and loyalty now. State Missions promotes

a Baptist Student program among 20,000 sons and daughters from our Baptist homes who are attending the many colleges or universities, business and medical schools of our State. These young men and women constitute a great potential leadership for all areas of tomorrow's world. The churches will need the strength and service of that leadership. Baptist Student Centers near the campuses of our State colleges and other schools are a must. This year the Convention purchased a beautiful site for a student center at the University of North Carolina where we have 1,800 Baptist students.

J. What are the sources of support whereby State Missions can function effectively and fruitfully in all these phases of work? Here they are:

(1) Cooperative Program (if goals are met)	\$300,000 (hoped for)
(2) Sunday School Board	29,000
(3) Home Mission Board	4,000
(4) Woman's Missionary Union Week of Prayer and Sunday School Offerings in the Churches	(goal 200,000)
(5) Miscellaneous Income	7,000
	<u>\$540,000</u>
(6) If we meet the requests on church lots for 1957, the budget would require \$560,000.	

It has constantly undergirded our total World Missions' program. If this goal is reached by our people, your twenty-two ministries of State Missions will have their 1957 needs met and the overdraft on State Missions for this year could be met in December.

K. Therefore, will you as an individual and your Sunday School and church do your part so that the first part of The Great Commission might be obeyed - and that these rich ministries might be continued to the extent that next year North Carolina and the world might have many more Christians and be more Christian.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

Our report on Home Missions for 1957 must of necessity deal with the 1956 figures. At the beginning of the year the Home Mission Board reported 1,180 missionaries. This is an increase of 81 over the previous year. The missionaries reported 39,458 professions of faith, which is an increase of 1,983 over last year.

The Home Mission Board's income for last year was as follows: from the Cooperative Program, \$2,027,369.87; Annie Armstrong Offering, \$1,574,890.61; and from designated gifts, \$127,761.01. This made a total of \$3,730,027.49.

This financial report seems gratifying. However, when we consider the stupendous task of Home Missions, this amount clearly shows an inadequacy. Every year each phase of service grows, and as a greater need is manifested, more money must be provided.

During 1957 the board has continued to emphasize church evangelism and every-member participated in soul-winning. Additions of personnel at headquarters office are Clovis A. Brantley, assistant secretary in the Department of Direct Missions; William B. Mitchell, superintendent of Jewish work; and Wendell Belew, Director of church sponsored mission work. The City Mission Program has been enlarged; and interest and work in pioneer areas has been extended. The best leadership of the boards missionaries has been challenged for special groups, such as the deaf, the Jews, the migrants, broken homes, juvenile delinquents, and ministry to military

personnel. The Chaplains Commission reports 11,074 professions of faith in their ministry. Indians, Negroes, and language groups have received major attention. There has been set a goal of 1,050 missionaries to serve the minority groups by 1964.

The demands for promotional and educational materials have been tremendous. Interest has been greatly increased in obtaining filmstrips, motion pictures, maps, mission study books, tracts, picture packets, the magazine and all other projects and published materials. Much missionary information and inspiration have been gained from schools of missions and assignment of home missionaries for special conferences.

Mrs. R. L. Mathis says, "Key words in the language of Southern Baptists today are 'Thirty Thousand'." This is most certainly one of the major challenges in connection with our Home Mission Board. Plans and efforts are proceeding in a great way toward this goal, which is to constitute 10,000 new churches and 20,000 additional mission stations in seven years. But there is much to be done to accomplish this. Our plans without our practice will avail little.

As an answer to their greatest needs, the Home Mission Board speaks pleadingly: "We need your prayers and personal interest, a larger proportion of the church budget dollar, a wider interest in tithing, more missionary volunteers and a share in every Southern Baptist's dedication."

May we as individual church members strive to supply these needs by dedicating ourselves anew to God, His Kingdom's work and the cause of missions. Let us help to spread over our entire Home Mission area the message from this scripture: "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved," Romans 10:13.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

The World Mission Program has been characterized by much advancement in many parts of the world. At the close of 1956 there were 1,113 missionaries under appointment.

One hundred and twenty-one missionaries were appointed for oversea service during 1956. This represents the largest number of appointments ever made in a year of the Foreign Mission Board's History. Southern Baptist now project work in thirty-eight countries. The largest of these are found in Brazil, Nigeria, and Japan.

One of the most outstanding of the works was the opening of Hong Kong Baptist College, where in the door-way of Red China, a remarkable educational opportunity is found. Profound impression have been made in the Near East by our Medical Missionaries.

Evangelism has also made much progress in many places. A city wide crusade was conducted in Hong Kong, and approximately 75,000 people heard the gospel with more than 2,500 making decisions for Christ. Such efforts have been launched in other field with equal results.

The number of volunteers for mission services have reached an all time peak. It has been an outstanding feature in the appointment of missionaries that so many have come from places of responsible leadership in pastorates, schools, and medical service. They have turned aside from opportunities that might challenge them at home and have surrendered to go to meet larger needs on mission fields.

Financial gains have demonstrated the determination in the advancement of World Wide Ministry. In 1956 the total income of the Foreign Mission Board was \$12,733,681. Southern Baptist gave through the

Cooperative Program to Foreign Missions the total of \$6,207,709 during the year 1956. The Lottie Moon Christmas Offerings have showed much gains in this world wide program, not only in money but in mission study, prayer, and life dedication.

If the objective of 1,750 missionaries is to be reached by 1963 every Baptist must realize that it will be done by faith and courage like Isaiah had when he said, "Here am I; send me."

The report on the Baptist Hospital was given by the Rev. M. D. Blanton for Rev. C. C. Matheny who was unable to attend because of illness. Dr. W. K. McGee of the Baptist Hospital and Winston-Salem was present and gave the address on the subject. The report was duly adopted and appears below.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

While here on this earth our Lord was a very busy person. He was ever on the alert for opportunities to bless those who were in need of His beneficent powers. Among the many and varied ministries that He rendered was that of healing those who were sick or whose bodies were deformed by disease or accident. In this field of healing our Lord set an example which people have sought to follow, and our Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem is a concrete evidence of this truth. The broad field of service rendered by our hospital and its personnel may be classified into two general classes, healing and training respectively.

HEALING: This ministry continues to grow from year to year. Last year approximately 15,000 bed patients were cared for in our hospital. Through the Out-Patient department approximately 120,000 patients received medical care, but were not confined to the hospital as bed patients. Many of these people, almost 50% of them, were unable to pay for this care, which others did pay a small portion of the cost. This medical care was made possible through the generosity of the Baptists of North Carolina as a result of the annual "Mothers' Day Offering." These patients came, not only from practically every county in this state, but also from many adjoining states.

TRAINING: This service covers a very broad field such as X-Ray Technology, Medical Diagnosis, Medical Records, Pharmacy, Nursing and

Religious counseling and instruction. The Hospital School of Nursing is the largest in the state. Courses in "practical Nursing" are also offered. At all times there is available a staff of doctors and surgeons available for any emergency.

GROWTH: The hospital continues to grow and expand. The new Chapel which has been in use for some months is available for worship, chapel services, prayer and meditation. It is contributing a vital part to the religious life of the patients and personnel of the hospital. A system of Air-Conditioning adds greatly to the patients during the hot summer months. The Medical school is currently being enlarged in order to further expand the ministry and service to those who come seeking medical care. The installment of a modern "Cobalt Therapy" machine, the first one in the state, is available for the treatment of Cancer.

NEEDS: In such an institution there are always current needs. The most pressing now are: (1) More adequate parking facilities for both personnel and patients as well as many visitors who come and go daily; (2) Increased funds through the Mothers' Day Offering" in order that more out-patient service can be rendered; and (3) a better understanding on the part of the public of the needs and the services of the hospital.

Mrs. C. P. McMahan, Associational Historian, reported on some accomplishments of the Association.

HISTORIAN REPORT

History looks back. Instead of looking back into history, into what we, as churches, have accomplished in the way of buildings, let us divide the word - and form two words - His Story, and look into the future - to what we may do.

Did you know? Southern Baptist Sunday School growth for the past 30 years was approximately $1\frac{1}{4}$ million greater than the preceding 81 years.

During these past 30 years our church membership increased over 5 million; churches increased 6,000; and church property increased $\$1\frac{1}{4}$ billions.

The building sets the pattern.

There is a high correlation between the square footage of available space and the growth of a Sunday School.

One of the most significant gains in recent years has been in the open country churches. Between 1949 and 1956 Sunday School enrolment in these churches gained 29.9 per cent; Church membership gained 12.2 per cent; Total gifts increased 98.3 per cent; and Church property increased 120 per cent.

It is an astounding reality that Baptist churches can reach all the people they can provide for in their buildings. One way to see to it that more people attend Sunday School, study the Bible, have an opportunity to accept Christ, and to dedicate their lives to nobler things, is to provide more space for them in a church building.

In January one man arose in the Sunday morning service and made a motion that the church buy an adjoining house and lot. As a result of the motion more than 400 persons were added to the Sunday School enrolment in a 6 months period.

Churches should not limit the growth of the Sunday School by waiting because they are not financially able to erect expensive church buildings. Such churches can erect buildings of a type that the members can pay for, and thus make it possible to reach more people.

Fruit comes on new growth. Roses bloom on new growth. Without new

growth there would be little fruit for food and few flowers for beauty and perfume. This law is as applicable to a Sunday School as to a fruit tree.

New units grow faster, win more people to Christ, and provide more workers.

Classes reach their maximum growth in a few months after their beginning.

One of the major reasons why many Sunday Schools fail to grow is because the present classes have more members already than can be cared for by the class officers. There must be room for growth in the framework of a Sunday School organization.

Grading by age provides the logical basis for adding new working units. Grading a Sunday School means arranging classes for people of the same age, or as nearly the same age as needed for the people involved.

Grading makes the organization of needed classes easy. Grading accelerates the growth of a Sunday School.

Will you, in obedience to the command of Christ, look at the harvest of souls in your community?

The records reveal that there are millions of men in the states where Southern Baptists work who are not enrolled in Sunday School. Based on the present class average enrolment of 25 to 30 men, it would take about 600,000 classes to enroll the men in our own territory who are not in Sunday School. There are about 45,000 classes for men in Southern Baptist Sunday Schools now. This means that 555,000 classes are needed and 555,000 rooms to house them.

Southern Baptists have 30,000 churches. Suppose these churches would average this year the organization of one additional class for men. The result would be the enrolment of 750,000 additional men.

Then, suppose these 30,000 churches should organize an average of one additional class each year for the next 5 years. It would mean an increase of 3,750,000 in the enrolment of men in our Sunday Schools. This would mean also an increase in the enrolment of women, boys, and girls, that would exceed the imagination of man. (For the family would come if the Father attended regularly.)

This increased enrolment would produce increased offerings, for world missions, build more Christian homes, lift our moral standards, strengthen the influence of our churches, and bless the lives of multitudes of people all around the world.

Southern Baptist Churches at this time have 1,600,000 Juniors and Intermediates enrolled in the 8 year span, 9-16 years. The average class enrolment for these is approximately 9.5. These Juniors and Intermediates are being promoted annually into the Young People's Departments. The average class enrolment for Young People is 13. On this basis it would take 123,077 classes to take care of the 1,600,000 Juniors and Intermediates now enrolled, whereas, the present number of classes for young people is approximately 40,000. This means an immediate need of 83,077 classes if not a single other person is enrolled, with as many rooms to house them.

The babies make up an important part of the human harvest in any community. What will the 6,000,000 babies born this year in the homes of the U.S. be 16 years from now? Adequate Nursery provision for all of the babies and adequate space for Juniors, Intermediates, and Young People will assure that the majority of the babies your church enrolls today will be Christians before they are 16 years of age.

Are these 3 provisions in your church as important as good roads, banks, and schools in your community?

By 1982 the U.S. population will be 250 million. There will be more babies -- 6 million a year; more young people -- over 100 million under 20; more old people -- 25 million over 65; and more households -- 25 million more by 1982.

This year, 1957, there are approximately 81 million white people

living in the 24 established Southern Baptist states. Of this number a minimum of 55 million are unreached by any Sunday School.

If in the next 30 years we do as well as in the past five, which were our best years, we will add 9 million more to our Sunday Schools, but our population will have increased 100 million.

In other words, there will be 50 million more unreached than now, or 105 million unreached people.

Our immediate task, if we maintain the progress we have made in recent years, is to reach 10 million people by 1964. We will need buildings for them.

AFTERNOON SESSION, October 15th

After the hymn, "My Jesus I Love Thee," and prayer by Rev. W. T. Luckadoo the afternoon session got under way.

The Rev. T. S. Lawrence made announcement of the proposed joint session of the Kings Mountain and the Sandy Run Associations to be held at Gardner-Webb College on October 25, 1957, as guest of the college.

The report of the South Mountain Baptist Assembly was given by Mrs. Mack D. McCurry, as follows as adopted.

REPORT ON SOUTH MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSEMBLY FOR REGION EIGHT

How often have all of us been told to "Mind your own business!" Well, the South Mountain Baptist Assembly is the business of every Baptist in Region Eight, but if you should go to the grounds you would likely think as some of us did who went recently, "Looks as if most of the Baptists in Region Eight have fallen down on this business!" So little that had been planned to be done this summer has actually been accomplished, and it is because we failed to do our part.

Last summer when we went out, we were not at all sure that we had ever found where the Assembly was supposed to be. This time we did find the spot because we camp upon the lake. Then we followed the road that led across the end of the nice big lake and kept on going, we knew not where because we saw so little that looked as if it could be called a part of an Assembly. Finally we came upon a little new cabin and much smaller lake that was really no more than a pond. There were a few tables for picnic lunches, but there were no signs of any picnicing. All about us were timbered mountain sides with very few level places that would do for building or play grounds. The roads were so rough and still too wet from recent rains to invite trying to drive on around and farther up the mountain. The men did walk on, but we women wandered around where we were and tried to plan for cabins and play grounds. We agreed it would require much money before any encouraging signs of development could be made. When the men returned, they reported that more grading had been done on the mountain side, that there was a magnificent view from where they went, but they also believed it would take much money to make necessary improvements. What had they expected to find? What had we women expected?

Did any of you go to Ridgecrest at least 40 years ago before it had been developed? If you did, how much of the Ridgecrest of today did you see in your dreams? Then why be surprised at the South Mountain situation? Just imagine what it could be forty years from now!

How many of you have gone to investigate this new development? How many of you pastors have gone up there? Did you take your deacons along with you so they could help back up your efforts to interest your churches? Or did you merely announce to your congregations that you had received an appeal for help in developing the South Mountain Assembly for Region Eight and if any one wanted to make a contribution they could do so? Did anyone make a contribution?

We have been told that the aim is "to help meet the growing camping needs of the churches and associations in Region Eight. The purpose is not to compete with the present state camps and assemblies but to supplement them." How many of the youth in your churches went to any camps this summer? Why not? There are Ridgecrest, Camp Pinnacle, and others. They are too expensive. Too far away. Then why not pitch in and develop this one in our own region where the cost will be but little and where it is within about an hour's drive from any association?

Region Eight is made of ten counties: McDowell, Burke, Catawba, Yadkin, Davie, Lincoln, Gaston, Cleveland, Polk, and Rutherford. There are 467 churches in these counties, Baptist churches, with a membership of 135,000 as of the report before the revivals for this current year.

It was suggested that each one of these 135,000 Baptists give at least 25¢ with which to begin the work of developing the Assembly. If this had been done it would have amounted to \$33,750. But was it done? Did each member of the Sandy Run churches contribute 25¢? Just because we haven't done our part is no reason why we should not get busy and back up this really wonderful project. I'll give my 25¢, maybe even my dollar. Will you?

Where is this Assembly? It is 13 miles from Morganton on Old Highway 18 and about one and a half or two miles off the highway on the right on a dirt road that is good enough for an all-weather road. This road leads to the camp itself. The Assembly roads have been graded but not topped for wet weather. This is still a part of the project.

What are the possibilities? Some one has said, "It is better to build boys than to mend men." An ideal spot for boys camping could be made out there in the mountains away from every one and every temptation. And don't leave the girls out! Years ago I brought a group of girls to Ridgecrest all the way from Oklahoma. They had a wonderful time. So could our girls of Sandy Run have a wonderful time at South Mountain Assembly one of these summers.

These sixty-eight acres, given to Region Eight by Mr. M. L. Smith of Fallston, are dedicated to God for Evangelism, Education, Inspiration, and Recreation. Let us in Sandy Run Association determine this day that we shall give our quarters, yes; and our dollars and then include in our church budgets an annual contribution to the South Mountain Baptist Assembly. Let us make this a reality, not a dream!

The report on Christian Literature was given by the Rev. Howard Keller and Brother C. W. Bazemore of the Biblical Recorder gave the address: As adopted the report follows:

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE REPORT

Good reading brings knowledge, and knowledge brings understanding,

and out of understanding comes the power to live wisely. Baptist work together in a great spiritual democracy. But no democracy can live unless its people keep informed and inspired by the right kind of reading. Give attention to reading, urged Paul to the early Christians. Blessed is he that readeth, declared Apostle John in his last message. Paul again said, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth." This doesn't mean just any kind of reading. Many of our homes in America doesn't know what Christian Literature is. Many of our Book Stores are flooded with unfit reading. It is our duty as Christians to try to get every home some kind of Christian Literature to read.

In the year of 1830, North Carolina Baptist organized themselves into the Baptist State Convention. The constitution stated that the main purpose was the promotion of missions, education, social service, and the distribution of sound religious literature. Since the Baptist have organized they have published much literature, for the help of every home and Church. Also much information concerning our Baptist State Convention work. Among this literature is the Biblical Recorder, it was founded about 123 years ago, it circulates about 61,500 papers each week, also we have the Chairty and Children, Home Mission, Home Life, and the Commission along with other good Baptist reading. No home is beyond the reach of this helpful reading. This Literature is worthy of your support. I urge every Pastor, Associational worker, Sunday School Superintendents, Training Union Director, Teachers, and Officers to promote every possible way for the circulation of these good papers.

Let's all read more in 1958, Remember good reading brings knowledge, and knowledge brings understanding, and out of understanding comes the power to live wisely.

The report on Baptist Homes for the Aging was given by the Rev. B. Fred Bryant and discussion followed by Rev. I. B. Corbett, and as adopted, the report appears below:

REPORT OF BAPTIST HOMES INCORPORATED

The North Carolina Baptist Homes were authorized by the convention November 14, 1950. The first Superintendent was elected January 9, 1951. The first group was admitted as operations began March 16, 1951. The North Carolina Baptist Homes were incorporated May 30, 1951 with James M. Hayes serving as Superintendent.

There has been constructed new administration and residential buildings that will make it possible to care for 100 residents. 20 at Resthaven, 36 at Albermarle Home and 44 in the new buildings. In February special offerings were taken in our churches throughout the state. Our association participated with 35 of our churches giving \$857.64. The completion of these new buildings left an indebtedness of over \$100,000.00, but raised the assets of the Homes to more than one half million dollars.

In closing may we be grateful for the progress our Homes have made and lend our support to this worthy cause by our prayers and our means. We recommend that each church take a special offering in February, as authorized by our State Convention.

The report of the Associational Music Department was given by Brother Edwin Chenoweth, Sandy Run Associational Music Director and appears as adopted.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

We appreciate your cooperation during this first year of the church music education program for Sandy Run Association. Our objectives for the year were accomplished. Our ministry aided two churches in securing song leaders during the evangelistic crusade. Our music education committee planned, promoted, and conducted three hymn sings and School of Music.

We were privileged to have had our State Music Secretary, Mr. Joseph O. Stroud, to conduct the school. Faculty members were Rev. Zeb Moss, Mr. J. F. Wells, Mr. Harry Chauvin, Mrs. T. S. Lawrence, and Mr. E. F. Chenoweth. Much interest and enthusiasm was shown in the School in that 269 were enrolled with an average attendance of 206 for the week. Thirty-one of our churches were represented; also, three churches from other Associations were represented. There were 117 music training awards earned.

The Music Education Conference held October 7, 1957, approved plans to conduct a Hymn Sing each quarter in 1958. A School of Music was planned for September 1 - 5, 1958. The School will be held at the First Baptist Church at Forest City. Last, we urge every church in Sandy Run Association to follow the suggestion of our Southern Baptist Music Leaders, to study during 1958 the new text in the Church Music Training Course, "The Church Music Manual." This text is related to the Music Department as "Building a Standard Sunday School" is related to the Sunday School. It is preferable that the pastor teach the book rather than the music leadership.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

This year our Association is reporting 61 churches, 2 missions, all having Sunday Schools. Our Sunday School enrolment this year is 15,543, an increase of 600 over last year.

Achievements this past year include 20 churches observing January Bible Study, 51 Vacation Bible Schools reported, 26 churches reported 406 training awards.

We respectfully submit the following recommendations:

1. That we adopt for this year the theme, "Ye are Witnesses."
2. That we major in our Sunday School work on more people in Bible Study, more effective Bible teaching, and more people won, developed and enlisted.

3. That the Sunday School leadership of each church in our Association be urged to:

Establish a goal of 125 enrolled in Sunday School for each 100 Church Members.

Adopt a goal of 1 baptism for each 8 church members.

Provide a Training program which would include January Bible Study Week, Preparation Week, and "Operation Home Study."

We had a one night clinic for training Associational Sunday School Officers and for planning our program for next year. This Clinic was held October 11, 1957. We set worthy goals: To enlist 45 Churches to observe January Bible Study Week, January 6-10, 1958, to have 61 Vacation Bible Schools, and to enlist 30 churches to observe Preparation Week, September 21-28. The Vacation Bible School Clinic will be held in April. The Mass Meetings will be held November 4 at High Shoals Church, February, May, and August with other dates and places to be announced.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

1957

Theme for the year: "Serving the Lord Christ."

The aim of our Training Union work for the year, as related to the theme, was to strengthen our allegiance to the Lord Christ and to increase our usefulness in his service. As a whole, this has been a good year for this phase of our Associational program, and yet, we feel that there is yet "much land to be possessed." It has been our desire, through the Training Union, to give strength and support to our Baptist Program by actually doing as we have been taught through the Bible Study periods of our over-all church program.

During the year it has been encouraging to know that so many of our people were taking advantage of so many of the fine study course books now offered by our denomination. This is to be noticed by the number of Training Union awards earned, by the people of the Association, during the past year's work. The total number of awards was 1,730 which was just 170 short of the goal of 1,900 for the entire year. With some encouragement from the church leaders, of the the back yard study course idea, we feel

that we shall go well beyond our goal for next year. Our Association was second place in the state in the number of Training Union awards requested for the month of March, with a total number of 839. On the study of Alcohol, our association was the highest in the state in the number of churches requesting awards. To me, this is an indication of a desire from our people to learn more and better ways of serving our Lord Christ.

Our assemblies of the state were not as well attended during the year as we feel they could have been. According to the reports, we had only four churches with a total number of 30 people who attended the assemblies during the year. With Ridgecrest and Fruitland being so close to us, we are missing much by not getting in on the study and experience of those who have given so much time to Training Union work. In these we almost have a "gold mine" at our finger tips. At Caswell our Association tied for the highest number of workers present for the State Training-Union planning meeting.

As a whole, the meetings of the association have been well attended and instructive. Our "M" Night was not as well attended as we had hoped for, but it seems that having the meeting on Saturday night was against good attendance. Dr. and Mrs. J. E. Lambdin were the speakers and we had 561 present. This is the night for the mobilization of our thought and plans for coming year's work.

There is much talk about on-the-job training. That is just what Training Union is for the local church. If we are to have better and more leaders in the future, then, we must train them today. It is through this part of the church life we are producing the leaders so badly needed if we are to double our number of preaching places and churches by the year of 1964. We shall not be satisfied until we have done all that we can to make our training program what Christ would have it be. When this is done, then, we can sing, with real meaning, "Onward Christian Soldiers marching as to war."

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

The some 825,000 Baptists in North Carolina continue to demonstrate their belief in the importance of supporting Baptist Colleges as training centers for preparing Baptist leadership. This interest is shown in the enrollment of 6,500 students, most of whom come from our Baptist homes, with approximately 800 being trained for the ministry and other full-time Christian service.

For aiding these young people in their college training the Baptist of North Carolina are contributing an average of \$1.25 per person for both operating and capital outlay purposes in these colleges, or a total of \$1,100,000 annually. It is our hope that in the near future it will be possible to increase this financial assistance to provide an average of \$2.00 per member in our Baptist churches; certainly this is not too much to expect our people to invest in the training of our future leaders in the greatest denomination in the state.

Baptists of North Carolina should know that they are doing more to provide for the training of their young people than any of the other denominations, and yet we cannot escape the fact that of the 21,000 Baptist Young People enrolled in colleges in North Carolina, only about one out of every five is able to attend one of the Baptist colleges. In addition to the training of ministers and other full-time church workers, these colleges are our chief source for Baptist doctors, lawyers, teachers and business leaders.

These seven Baptist colleges - Wake Forest, Meredith, Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill and Wingate - have an annual operating budget of \$6,000,000 and a plant valuation of \$35,000,000.

In 1957, for the first time, these colleges, through the Council on Christian Education, promoted Father's Day as Christian Education in all the Baptist churches of the state. Although the total contributions were not as much as hoped for, the response throughout the state was most encouraging, and already plans are being made for Father's Day, Sunday, June 15, 1958, and we urge all our pastors and other friends of Christian Education to include this in their calendar of activities for the new year.

MINISTER'S RETIREMENT REPORT

The Relief and Annuity Board was from the beginning constituted to render a service to those work in our Master's cause. For 39 years this has been the challenge, and they have met it with all the means at their command. Each year they have been striving to build a more solid foundation to this Southern Baptist "House of Security."

One is eligible for membership in the protection plan when he becomes an active pastor.

The cost of this plan is paid equally. The State Convention, the local church and the pastor pay; 5% of the pastor's basic salary.

This protection plan offers the following benefits:

1. A retirement annuity based on ones salary and the number of years he participates in the plan.
2. A widow's annuity based on the percentage of the pastor's potential annuity.
3. A disability annuity not to exceed \$900.00 per year.
4. A choice of early retirement at reduced annuity.
5. A lump sum death benefit paid to the widow or the beneficiary named.

The report on Associational Missions was presented by Associational Missionary, Rev. W. Van Carrol, was adopted and appears below:

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

Having come to the Association the first of August, your Associational Missionary doesn't know much about the work yet, and it is a bit difficult to get a picture of the Association from a statistical point of view, for three church letters have not been received.

However, the fifty-eight church letters do reveal some things. They show that at least 27 churches had one or more Sunday School Training courses. Twenty-one churches had the January Bible Study Week. But the total number of Sunday School training courses was less than the year before.

There were 49 Vacation Bible Schools, 43 Training Unions, 44 W. M. U. 's, and 23 Brotherhoods reported.

All but eight churches contributed through the Cooperative Program about \$5,500.00 more than the year before, and all but thirteen churches gave \$250.00 more to the Associational Missions Program last year than year before.

Your missionary's report of activities for August and September is as follows: Visited in 19 services (Worship, Sunday School, Training Union, and Prayer Meeting); delivered 13 sermons, addresses, and prayer meeting messages; taught 5 Sunday School classes; held 26 individual conferences; attended the following associational meetings: two group Training Union Officers and Leaders' Conferences and helped in one of them; one Training Union Mass Meeting; one Sunday School meeting; Associational "Prove Me" Tithers' Meeting; Associational Pastors' Conference; and four nights of the Associational Music School; also, attended the following meetings outside the Association: Associational Training Union Officers Planning Meeting at Caswell; three days of the Home Missions Week at Ridgecrest; Regional

W. M. U. Leadership and Institute Conference, Hickory; Regional Sunday School Planning Meeting, Asheville; helped in a Training Union Enlargement Campaign in Maryland; published two issues of bulletins and mailed 968 copies; mailed 554 letters and cards; and traveled 1,725 miles.

The number of organizations observing the seasons of prayer are: Foreign Missions - 74; Home Missions - 70; State Missions - 64; 156 Mission study books were taught and 1,223 read approved books. 92 organizations were engaged in Community Missions. 1,884 contributed regularly through the Cooperative Program. We have 15 full graded unions.

The report on the American Bible Society was presented by the Rev. Carl G. Mauney who spoke briefly to his report and it appears as adopted:

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

"The Bible Speaks Today" is not just a slogan. It is the experience of millions of people around the world. It is a challenge to action. The Bible must speak to more people in this Southern Baptist World Missions Year - and in all the years ahead. If the people of the world are to know Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations, they must have the Bible. Each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart no other language can speak.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay when he must leave - and keep on speaking to a man's heart.

The American Bible Society helps missionaries translate the Bible. It publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost.

During 1956 the American Bible Society distributed more than 15 million volumes of Scripture, supplied over 13,000 Bibles and other Scriptures to Hungarian refugees, donated nearly a million Scripture volumes for distribution by Chaplains to our Armed Forces.

The Society now rejoices in the translation of the Bible into more than 1,100 languages. The entire Bible has been translated and published in 210 languages; a complete Testament in 270 more; and at least a Gospel or other complete book in 629 additional languages.

Figures on gifts from the churches of our Association to the American Bible Society were not available. But our 8½ million Southern Baptists gave in 1956 a total \$120,732. This is just a little more than one and one-half cents per member per year. "Brethren, these things ought not so to be."

We earnestly plead with you, therefore, that if at all possible you put the American Bible Society in your budget for some amount. If this is not feasible, then take an offering for the Society sometime during the year.

The report on the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina was given by the Rev. W. G. Camp, the report being the annual report sent out from the Superintendent and appears below as adopted:

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

UNMET NEEDS:

The year 1956 was another busy one at the Baptist Children's Homes. We were able to admit to our care only one-fifth of the children for whom application was made. There were a total of 813 applications. Of this number only 169 children could be admitted to some phase of our program. Certainly all the other 644 were in need or their applications would not have been signed by Baptist Pastors.

Careful research by our Social Service Department, in cooperation with the Pastors who had signed the applications, made it possible to place many of these 644 children with relatives or other Agencies where their needs are being met. Many others could not be placed and are still waiting for someone to come to their rescue. Our Pastors have been most tolerant and co-operative in trying to reach the weighty decisions as to which children were in greatest need and should be admitted to fill our few vacancies.

The question often arises, "How many dependent children should North Carolina Baptists provide for?" Probably an exact answer is impossible. Last year we served a total of 751, an increase of 15 over the year before.

Of these, 126 were supported in Foster Boarding Homes. Perhaps a conservative estimate is that Baptists of North Carolina should serve about 1,000 children annually. It is, therefore, planned to gradually expand the Foster Home Program until we as a Denomination are caring for our proportionate share of dependent children.

Another need is the Indian Orphanage at Pembroke. This Home, which cares for fifteen to twenty children is located in Robeson County in the Burnt Swamp Baptist Association. Since this Home has not been and probably cannot be adequately supported by the local Association, considerable sentiment has developed among North Carolina Baptists for admitting it as part of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc. In view of this sentiment and the pressing need, the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Children's Homes at their regular annual meeting in May, 1957, voted unanimously to recommend to the Baptist State Convention, at its annual meeting in November, that the Pembroke Orphanage be made a part of the North Carolina Baptist Child Care Program. If the Convention approves this action, it will necessitate the erection of one Cottage at Pembroke at a cost of about \$50,000.00, and an additional operating budget of about \$20,000.00 per year.

HOW CAN BAPTISTS FINANCE THESE ADDITIONAL NEEDS?:

We believe we can get the money for the cottage through special gifts and requests. The current support would have to come through the churches. Our Baptist Churches have two plans for supporting the Children's Homes.

Plan Number I is a combination of the Once-A-Month Offering and the Cooperative Program. Through this plan the Homes receive a fixed amount. This cannot be increased or decreased except by vote of the Convention.

Plan Number II is the Thanksgiving Offering. Every dollar of this comes to the Children's Homes and may be increased by the Churches to meet the increasing needs as far as our people wish to go.

The only possible way now for your Children's Homes to get more money to meet these challenging needs is through an increased Thanksgiving Offering in November. If every Church will increase its Thanksgiving Offering ten per cent this will give us the \$20,000.00 to support the children at Pembroke. As our people go beyond this amount in their giving, we will expand the Foster Home Program and care for some of the 644 children who had to be turned away last year. Surely the Master is not pleased with His servants until they have done their best.

THE BUILDING PROGRAM CONTINUES:

Since our report last year we have built a new Swimming Pool at Kennedy Home, and a New Cottage for boys is under construction. Perhaps a contract for another Boys Cottage at Mills Home will be let within the next twelve months. These new buildings are erected with special gifts and bequests.

CHARITY AND CHILDREN:

Charity and Children continues to serve North Carolina Baptists in promoting the Kingdom of God. It not only keeps our people informed about their program of Child Care, but it also strives to give a little clearer insight into all phases of our Denominational work. Here it joins hands with the Biblical Recorder and all Southwide Baptist publications in trying to let the people see what transpires in our Conventions, Associations, Board meetings, and Institutional programs. The circulation continues to grow. The circulation is about 52 thousand. We believe every Church will profit by a Charity and Children Club.

Club rates in bundles of ten or more are 60¢ per year. Individual subscriptions are \$1.00 per year. Free copies are sent to Pastors and Sunday School Superintendents. If you are not getting your copy, please write Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Thomasville, North Carolina

The report on Evangelism in our Association was given by the Rev. T. S. Lawrence, chairman of that department. Brother Lawrence spoke to his report and then recognized the Rev. J. R. Featherston, the new chairman of Evangelism whose message was challenging. The report appears below as adopted:

EVANGELISM REPORT

For ten consecutive years the Sandy Run Association has conducted a Simultaneous Revival Campaign. During these ten years many have been won to Christ. The membership of our churches has been greatly revived, and the fellowship among the pastors and churches has been greatly blessed. In the majority of these years the number of baptisms has increased. The records of our Association show the value of such an effort, and the records of Heaven prove the blessing of such concerted action. Southern Baptists have come to believe in a Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade, and are planning now in a little over a year to launch another great southwide effort that is hoped will become nationwide. We are grateful that the Sandy Run Association has set a pace for such an evangelistic effort in our state.

The Simultaneous Effort has been marked with excellent cooperation, good planning, and faithfulness on the part of the committees appointed. For the past several years the Simultaneous Revival was preceded by a week of training in many of the churches on soul winning, and in some of these weeks we have enrolled over a thousand people studying soul winning and church leadership. We are deeply grateful for the part that our Associational Missionary has had in the work of preparation and training, as well as promotion of the Simultaneous Effort.

This past year we had thirty-eight churches participating in the revivals. We hope this coming year will witness an even greater number for the larger the number of churches participating, the greater the blessings. Our pastors are recommending, through the Associational Board, that we set the weeks of March 16 - 30, 1958 for our Simultaneous Revival. Let me urge each of you to do your part to enlist your church in this great effort for every church that enters is blessed and also strengthens the work in our own Association. Put this date in your church calendar and begin now to pray and work for a great Simultaneous Effort in our Association.

We suggest that each church appoint a Committee on Evangelism so that the evangelistic fires may be kept burning in each local church. The greatest tragedy a church has is not to win people to Christ. This is our first and foremost task. Let us give ourselves to this effort.

After serving several years as your Evangelistic Chairman, I am passing on this responsibility to another. Your Nominating Committee is recommending Rev. J. R. Featherston. Will you give him your best support for Christ and the salvation of the lost in your local communities and Association.

The report on Stewardship was given by the Rev. R. W. Hovis, Chairman, who introduced Dr. J. C. Canipe for the address. This marvelous address closed the morning session, and the report appears as adopted:

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Stewardship presumes that one party is the managing agent of another party who is the owner of a given property or of given values. In this

capacity, God has invited us to be His stewards, since He is the Owner of all. "For every beast of the forest is mine, and the cattle upon a thousand hills." Psalm 50:10. Again, "The earth is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof; the world and they that dwell therein." Psalm 24:1. These thoughts are repeated in I Cor. 10:26, 28. It is a wonderful privilege to be a steward of God. We therefore should seek to become the best stewards possible.

Stewardship means then, first, to recognize God as the Owner of all; and secondly, to see ourselves as His managing agents. When we see ourselves--our all--in God's ownership, it is a joy to become a good steward. It becomes a sought-after goal. Stewardship is based on, and measured by, our love for God. Jesus asked Peter, "Lovest thou Me more than these?" Jno. 21:15. Jesus said again, "Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Matt. 6:21. Do we love God a little or none? Do we love God much or only a little? Our stewardship manifests our true love for our God and His Cause.

Stewardship means to put God first. Elijah told the widow of Zarephath, "Make me thereof a little cake first, and bring it to me, and after make for thee and for thy son." I Kings 17:13. Elijah was God's representative, and thus came first. The meal and the oil lasted. Can we say that we love God, and not put His Cause first in our support? Stewardship means that we are converted fully to the way of Jesus, Who put His Heavenly Father first, and gave His all for us!

If we think and pray stewardship, we shall become good stewards. "For as he thinketh in his heart, so is he." Proverbs 23:7. Good stewardship is pleasing to God. "For God loveth a cheerful giver." II Cor. 9:7.

Stewardship means an Eternal Investment. Jesus said to a wealthy man, "Go and sell that thou hast, and give to the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in Heaven." Matt. 19:21.

Tithing is the minimum of our investment in stewardship. Certainly we of the A. D. Era cannot afford to do less than did the people of the B. C. Era, since we possess the Salvation which they could only anticipate in faith!

God invites us to prove His genuineness in sustaining those who faithfully support His cause. In Malachi 3:10, God asks us to prove Him by bringing the complete tithe into His storehouse. Then His blessing will be so great that we shall have no room for more! At this very time all North Carolina Baptists are invited to participate in a special three-months "Prove Me" Tithing Program. This State-wide Tithing Program should inspire every faithful Baptist to give God the opportunity to prove His grace in blessing our faithful stewardship. If all of our North Carolina Baptists would tithe, God's work in our state could more than double in scope. And our lives would be doubly enriched in His grace. This three-months program furnishes a wonderful opportunity to begin in this phase of good stewardship.

Christian Stewardship means the full life for a person, a church, a nation. "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord." Psalm 33:12.

May we resolve in our hearts to love our God and His Cause sufficiently to become Good Stewards, giving our best to Him! Let's begin now!

THE CONSTITUTION

SANDY RUN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Subject to Adoption October 17, 1956

Article I — Name

This body shall be known as the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

Article II — Membership

Sec. 1. The Association shall be composed of Baptist Churches of Rutherford County, Cleveland County and Polk County which are now members, and any other Baptist churches which may hereafter be admitted as provided.

Sec. 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented by her pastor and two representatives. Any church with more than fifty members shall be entitled to a messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. New churches may be admitted by a majority vote of messengers present after careful examination and found to be regular in their organization, orthodox in their doctrine, and supporting objects of the Association, State, and Southern Baptist Conventions. Churches are to be accepted under watchcare of the Association for a period of one year in order that the above may be determined.

Sec. 4. The Association may at any time dissolve connection with any church that becomes heterodox in doctrine or disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Sec. 5. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure.

Sec. 6. In case of internal dissention in a church and two parties coming up to the Association, each claiming to represent the church; neither party shall be seated as messengers until the question is decided as to which party is the church in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of messengers present.

Article III — Objects

The objects of the Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence, and spiritual power of the churches and to direct, promote, and develop their energies in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially

along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the State Baptist Convention, and the Association itself.

Article IV - Meetings

Sec. 1 The Association shall meet in annual session on Tuesday and Wednesday after the Second Sunday in October of each year. The Moderator shall call the body to meet in extra session if necessity shall arise.

Sec. 2 The Associational year shall begin October 1 of each year and close September 30 of the following year.

Article V - Officers and Duties

Sec. 1. The officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, and leaders of the organized work in the Association, who shall be chosen annually by a majority present.

Sec. 2. The officers shall perform all duties usually devolving upon such offices in well deliberative assemblies.

Sec. 3. The term of Moderator shall not exceed more than two consecutive years.

Sec. 4. The Missionary of the Sandy Run Baptist Association shall work with and assist the churches and missions of the Association in the promotion of their work and shall be under the supervision of the Associational Board.

Article VI - Associational Board

Sec. 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of the officers of the Association (Article V, Sec. 1) who shall also be the officers of this Board with the Moderator as chairman, the leader of each of the Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music,) the Associational Missionary (ex-officio), the Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative on the Baptist State Convention General Board, each active pastor, and two members selected by each active church of the Association.

Sec. 2. This body shall act for the Association in the interim between annual sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, neither taking any action contrary to the will of the Association, nor initiating any new policy or practice binding upon the Association unless specifically so directed. However, in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action so taken shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for its consideration.

Sec. 3. The Board shall be divided into committees with assigned duties (Article VII, Sec. 1.)

Sec. 4. The Clerk will make a report to the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 5. This body shall meet on Monday following the first Sunday in each quarter. The place may be decided.

Article VII - Committees and Their Duties

Sec. 1. ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD COMMITTEES. The Associational Board shall be divided by the Committee on Committees into the following committees with their duties.

I. ADVISORY STEERING COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Associational Missionary, the leader of each Associational Organization (Pastors' Conference, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music), Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative of the Baptist State Convention General Board, the Chairman of the Associational Board Committee 2-7, and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

(1) To study and act upon any matters of business of the Associational Board between quarterly meetings of the Board. Any action taken shall be dependent upon the approval of the Associational Board.

(2) To counsel and advise any committee or church in the Association on any suggestion that may be submitted to it.

(3) To counsel, advise, and direct the Associational Missionary and recommend to the Associational Board any necessary changes in any phase of the work.

(4) To assist the Associational Missionary in his work and, in event of his resignation, this Committee shall be responsible for finding and recommending a successor to the Associational Board.

(5) To work with the Associational Missionary in formulating a calendar of activities for the Association.

2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. This Committee and its chairman, consisting of nine members, shall be appointed by the Moderator of the Association soon following the annual session of the Association. It shall, as soon as possible, meet and assign the members of the Associational Board to the various committees, naming the chairman of each except as otherwise provided, and name the Standing Committees and their chairman (Article VII, Sec. 2.) Also, it shall name any other committee assigned to it.

3. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM. This Committee shall be composed of the Associational Chairman of Evangelism and members assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings and organizations of the Association. It shall also encourage and help arrange revivals in every section of the Association and lead in simultaneous revivals. The chairmen will submit a written report to the annual session of the Association.

4. COMMITTEE ON ORDINATIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall serve in an advisory capacity when called upon to assist in the examination and ordination of deacons and candidates for the gospel ministry.

5. COMMITTEE ON LOCATION OF NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. Its duties shall be as follows:

(1) Receive and consider any request by any group for a mission to be organized into a Baptist church and recommend action to the Associational Board.

(2) Be alert to develop any lead that might be given toward the establishment of a new church or mission. Advise with the group, or groups, involved what steps should be taken in the location and organization of a mission or church.

(3) Consider applications from any church or churches desiring membership in the Sandy Run Association and make recommendations to the Associational Board as to what action should be taken.

6. **COMMITTEE ON FINANCES, BUDGET, AND AUDITING.** This Committee shall be composed of the Treasurer as chairman, Moderator, S. S. Supt., T. U. Director, W. M. U. President, Brotherhood President, Church Music Director, and as many other members as the Committee on Committees may deem wise. This Committee shall prepare and recommend a budget for the Associational Program and suggest ways and means to the churches whereby the budget can be raised. It shall also be responsible for auditing the Treasurer's book.

7. **COMMITTEE ON FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE.** The Committee on Committees shall appoint this Committee, naming the chairman, and assign as many members as it deems wise. It shall consider all church or mission requests for pastoral aid and requests to be made to the State or Home Mission Boards for aid or loans in buying church lots and shall make recommendations concerning them to the Associational Board.

8. **COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.** This Committee and its chairman shall be named by the Committee on Committees. It shall bring a suitable report at the annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches to have died since the last annual session.

9. **COMMITTEES TO REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL WORK.** These are Committees on (1) State Missions, (2) Home Missions, (3) Foreign Missions, (4) Christian Literature, (5) Christian Education, (6) Children's Homes, (7) Homes for the Aging, (8) Baptist Hospital, (9) Relief and Annuity, (10) Temperance and Civic Righteousness, (11) Stewardship and (12) American Bible Society. These Committees and their chairmen, composed of not less than five members, shall be named by the Committee on Committees. Their duties shall be to inform our people about the work they are chosen to represent and lead in promoting it. The chairman of each Committee shall make a brief written report at the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 2. STANDING COMMITTEES. These Committees and their chairmen shall also be appointed by the Committee on Committees at the time the Associational Board Committees are appointed, but they are not necessarily composed of Board members. They shall serve through the annual session of the Association. These Committees are:

1. **TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of five members and shall report at the annual session. It shall state the time of the next annual meeting of the Association (Article IV, Sec. 1) recommend the place or places of the meeting, and recommend the preacher and the alternate.

2. **PROGRAM COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Associational Music Director, Associational Missionary, and host pastor or pastors. It shall prepare a printed program for the annual meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall in the opening of the annual meeting of the Association present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

3. **RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE.** This committee shall be composed of five members. It shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it may deem expedient. Also, resolutions and recommendations presented at the annual session may be referred to this Committee.

4. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE:** This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall contact and nominate to the Associational Board in its last meeting before the annual session of the Association for election, all the leaders of Associational Organizations (S. S., T. U., W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music) so these leaders in turn can present their helpers to the

Association in annual session for election. The Committee shall also contact and nominate at the annual session of the Association all Associational Officers, (Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian) and the Chairman of Evangelism.

Article VIII - Trustees

Sec. 1. There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer.

Sec. 2. The Trustees and their chairman shall be appointed annually by the Committee on Committees at the time this Committee appoints the Associational Board Committees.

Sec. 3. Their duties shall be to hold title to property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association with the Association or Associational Board's fore-knowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution of the Association, and with State laws as they effect the Association.

Article IX

This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers in attendance, provided that notice is given and the proposed amendment is stated during the first day, but no vote shall be taken upon the proposed amendment until the afternoon session of the second day.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with song and prayer.

2. The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association. He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise provided for.

3. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be considered an authority in all cases not provided for in the Rules of Order; "but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the Presiding Officer may use his discretion subject to an appeal to the Association."

4. Brethren invited to sit with us shall have the liberty of discussion, but not of voting.

5. Speakers shall rise and address the Moderator, and shall confine themselves to the subject under discussion. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the Association.

6. No question shall be discussed without a motion thereon first being made and seconded. Motions made and seconded shall be stated by the Moderator previous to any discussion thereon. If motion contains two or more parts, it shall be divided at the request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote of the body.

FIRST DAY

The sixty-ninth annual session of the Sandy Run Association was opened by the Moderator, Rev. Fred A. Mauney, at 9:30 A. M. with the declaration "that all registered messengers and messengers registering to-day and tomorrow, be now considered as the Sandy Run Association in

annual session for the transaction of business".

The Sandy Run Association was organized in the year 1890. The Preacher and the Moderator were one, Rev. G. W. Rollins. Mat McBrayer was the clerk of this session at Bethel Church.

Fred A. Mauney, our Moderator, is the present pastor of Florence Church. Our Historian, M. D. Blanton, has prepared brief histories of our host churches.

FLORENCE

On Sunday afternoon, April 9, 1922, a group of thirty-three Christian men and women, with zeal and vision, met at what was then known as the Welfare Building of the Florence Mill and organized the Florence Baptist Church. Rev. C. C. Matheny, whose love for the church and God's kingdom, was the guiding personality behind the movement, and he was called as the new church's first pastor.

Eventually the church felt that it was necessary to seek its own place of worship. The first house of worship was erected just south west of the Florence Mill on what is now called Powell Street. This was a framed structure which was soon expanded in order to meet the growing needs of the progressive church.

The Florence Church has been served by the following faithful and dedicated pastors: Rev. C. C. Matheny (1922-26); Rev. Z. D. Harrill (1927-28); Rev. E. N. Epley (1929-39); Rev. E. W. Bailes (1940-43); Rev. C. C. Matheny, for a second pastorate with Rev. Wilson W. Padgett as Associate Pastor (1944-45); Rev. Fred Dabney (1946-53); and Rev. Fred A. Mauney (1953- -).

The Florence Church grew with such rapidity that eventually more space was needed. To meet this growing need a new location was secured at the corner of South Broadway and Florence Streets. Here the present new and beautiful edifice was erected. The congregation entered this new building on Sunday, June 15, 1941 for the first service. Rev. E. W. Bailes led the church in the erection of this building. In April, 1947 a second unit of departments and Sunday School rooms was completed and first used in January, 1948. Another addition was entered and dedicated on April 13, 1958.

The next forward step by the church was to provide an adequate church staff. A modern pastorium was erected and a home for the Minister of Music was purchased. The combined value of these two homes is more than \$30,000.

With such a rapid growth in the past, and with the present facilities now available, the church looks forward to a great future in service to its Lord and to the extension of His kingdom in the world.

WALLS

Although Walls Church was organized in 1844, no records were available to the historian prior to 1893. What information is here reported comes from the file of the Associational minutes which the historian has compiled. The Sandy Run Association was organized in 1890 and minutes of the first three years of the Association were unavailable. The historian offers apologies to the host church for being unable to make a more adequate report.

Bridges (1929-1930); Rev. L. N. Epley (1931-32); Rev. R. G. Melton (1944-1946); Rev. Dewey Newton (1947-1948); Rev. W. T. Luckadoo (1949-57); Rev. W. W. Abernathy (1958--).

2. Plans and construction for the present church plant were accomplished during the ministry of Rev. Barney Epley.

The report of the Associational Board of the Sandy Run Association was presented by the Clerk of the Association and Board, Rev. Coit E. Auten, and was adopted as follows:

ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD REPORT

The following is a brief report of the major transactions of the Associational Board during the year:
November 11, 1957

The calendar of activities was presented and with some changes made was adopted by the body.

The matter of money, gifts and honorariums given to the Associational Missionary was discussed with final actions placed before the Advisory Committee for final action.

January 16, 1958

Report presented that stated the Sixty-Ninth annual session of the Association would meet with Florence Church on Tuesday and Walls Church on Wednesday.

The clerk was instructed to place in the Library of Gardner-Webb College, copies of our minutes from the time of the organization of our Association.

January 27, 1958

The Advisory Steering Committee was called in special meeting to consider the question of gifts, donations, honorariums to the Associational Missionary. The Committee voted to follow the policy of the Southern Baptist Convention and the State Mission Board.

April 7, 1958

The Committee named by the Association to investigate the possibility of purchasing a home for the Associational Missionary reported that

funds were not available for this purchase and because of no money for an option or down payment, several good offers had to be rejected. A committee was appointed to seek ways of raising money for this purpose.

June 12, 1958

Recommendation was made to the committee on Boards of the Baptist State Convention that Rev. Fred A. Mauney be selected to serve on the State General Board.

Adopted the date for the Simultaneous Revival in 1959 to be March 15-29.
July 7, 1958

Voted to give the contract to Missouri Baptist Press to publish the 1958 Associational Minutes.

October 6, 1958

The Moderator reported that the Association had purchased a seven room house on East Main Street, Forest City for \$10,000, one thousand dollars of which has been paid on the dwelling. Mr. Smith, owner of the house, will release it to the Associational Missionary on or about January 1, 1959, at which time arrangements will be made for monthly installments approximating the amount now paid in rent.

Mr. Sam Jenkins, Trinity Church, presented the report on State Missions and Dr. E. L. Spivey, Secretary of the State Missions spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

STATE MISSION REPORT

State Missions is the missionary effort on the part of North Carolina Baptists to reach the unsaved for Christ and teach, enlist, and train the saved in giving, living, and serving through the churches and throughout the world.

Only about 2,100,000 of the 4,500,000 people in the state above the age of eight years are affiliated with some kind of church. It is safe to say that North Carolina is not half Christian.

Approximately 60 per cent of the 846,000 Baptists in our state is not dedicated in the Christian profession.

Our people need to be taught and trained. Therefore, many of the significant phases of our State Missions work are promoted through the Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Royal Ambassadors, Church Development and Music Department.

Since 60 per cent of the people in our state are lost, they need the Saviour. State Missions has a Department of Evangelism dedicated to the task of winning people to Christ.

Pastors' Schools are promoted through State Missions to help to have better trained pastors. Last year about 175 pastors received better training at Fruitland. Then there were refresher courses offered at Mars Hill and Chowan Colleges during the summer.

State Missions are supported by gifts through the Cooperative Program, Special State Mission's Offerings, Sunday School Board and the Home Mission Board. Over 50 per cent of the support of the department comes through the Cooperative Program.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE REPORT

In the absence of Rev. Fred Kelly, the Association voted to include the Hospital Report in these minutes. Rev. Bob Gunter, Baptist Hospital, brought an address on the work of the Hospital.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL'S REPORT

Our Baptist Hospital provides a well-rounded program of medical care and training under Christian guidance and influence.

It serves our people when they are sick and need specialized medical care which requires facilities beyond those available in their own communities. The Hospital works in full co-operation with our local physicians. It offers a wide range of specialized training in the different fields of medicine and surgery, in nursing, in various other fields of medical care, and in pastoral care.

Last year the Hospital provided bed care for 16,000 patients. There were 120,000 visits to the clinics and offices of the medical staff and chaplains. Service patients came from 92 of the 100 counties of the state. The services of the medical staff were given free to all service patients, and the Hospital spent more than half a million dollars in providing free care for them beyond what they were able to pay.

A service patient pays what he can of the cost of this care. To help make up the difference between what he can pay and the cost, the Hospital has some assistance from welfare agencies and the Duke endowment for patients who can qualify, but it must depend primarily upon the Mother's Day offerings. This fund can be used only in cases of real need and after the patient's family has paid all it can and all other possible help has been secured.

Rev. M. D. Blanton, Associational Historian, presented his report which was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE HISTORIAN

Someone has said that no change shows no progress. That statement is just as true in the life of a church as it is in the life of an individual.

We feel sure that many changes have been made by other churches of the Sandy Run Association of which no report was made on their respective church letters. This brief report--brief because it is compiled from only fourteen church letters--is little more than just a faint glimpse of the true facts relative to historical events and activities. The writer of this report most sincerely hopes that those churches failing to report such facts will not feel that they have been overlooked.

The incidents which have been reported, relative to the history and the progress of the churches, may be grouped into three categories as follows: (1) Construction; (2) Improvements; and, (3) Pastoral Changes.

I. Construction:

- A. Bethel Church has completed its educational building, and now has a new sanctuary nearing completion.
- B. Camp Creek has a new church building under construction.
- C. Caroleen has purchased additional land for the church, home for Music Director and Nursery building and remodeling of the home for the Music Director.
- D. Glenwood Church has erected an attractive pastor's home near the church.
- E. Holly Springs occupied its new house of worship September 21, 1958.
- F. Temple has added a new two-car garage to the pastor's home.
- G. Mt. Lebanon has provided four new class rooms together with rest rooms to its church plant.
- H. Trinity Church has a new educational building which is nearing completion.

II. Improvements:

- A. Temple Church has added a "Baptismal Scene" as a background for the baptismal pool which will add much to the sacredness and beauty of the service.
- B. Mt. Lebanon Church has installed a new water heater in its building.

The Association was served a bountiful lunch by the host church.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was opened by a worship period conducted by Rev. James M. Ezell.

The Reports on Christian Education were given on the Sunday School by Bill Green, Training Union by Rev. Melvin Owens, and Baptist

Colleges by Rev. Clyde High. In the absence of Clarence F. Gaddy, Dr. P. E. Elliot, Gardner-Webb Junior College President, spoke to the report. Mr. Harvey N. Lance of Mars Hill College was introduced. The reports were adopted as follows:

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

There are 61 churches and 2 Missions in the Sandy Run Association and each has a Sunday School, making a total of 63 Sunday Schools this year. There were 57 Vacation Bible Schools with an enrolment of 5,645. Twenty churches reported 567 Training Awards. Many churches earned awards for which they did not receive credit because they failed to make requests for them from the State Sunday School Secretary.

The following meetings were held this year: The Associational Officers Clinic met on October 11 in Forest City at a supper meeting. A State Worker was present to lead us into plans for the year and bring us the Program of the State. November 4 at High Shoals Church an Officers and Teachers Conference was held. Another was held at Sandy Run Church on February 11. These featured Departmental Conferences and were very helpful to the newly elected officers who were there. April 21, 22 there were Vacation Bible School Clinics to help workers with new materials do a better job. On May 5, there was an inspirational meeting at Sandy Run Church with the Rev. Joe Bridges bringing an inspiring message on the Christian Home--this being Christian Home Week. A very helpful series of studies offered was the Gardner-Webb Extension Course held at Florence Church at which time courses were offered in Better Bible Teaching, Bible History, and Church Music.

The Sunday School helped promote the Group Training Schools and the Schools of Missions. This has been a busy year but there remains much to be done. Let us make every effort to support our Associational Officers as they begin a new year. We can make their duties easier in many ways but especially by attending the Associational meetings and by sending our reports in to them complete and on time.

The year's goal for training awards was 2,000 and at the present time we have gone over this by more than 500. By the time the reports are all in for the associational year, we will have gone over the 3,000 mark. This is a good indication that our people are taking advantage of the fine study course books for training.

The Youth Night service was attended by 168 people and our young people did a fine job with the program. This gives our youth a wonderful opportunity to further practice what they have learned in the local church. The attendance goal for the coming year is 250 and with your help we can go well beyond this.

Sulphur Springs was the place of our Speaker's Tournament. The tournament was fine, but we did not have enough participating. Some age

groups did not have anyone. Who knows but what this event could be the means of uncovering some real talent for the Lord? Now is the time for us to start with our people getting them ready for next spring.

One big event of the year's work was "M" Night. At this time 936 came together at Spencer Baptist Church to hear Dr. C. C. Warren, past president of the Southern Baptist Convention, speak to us on our theme for the year. Our purpose in this meeting was to so challenge those present that they would go back to the local church and really train for service in the Lord's great vineyard. God calls men to work for Him, but we cannot do our best until we train our best. Let us make 1959 our best Training Union year.

REPORT ON BAPTIST COLLEGES

North Carolina Baptists own seven good Christian colleges fully accredited by the North Carolina College Conference and the Southern Association of Colleges. These 844,689 Baptists delegate the operation of their colleges to trustees elected by the Baptist State Convention.

The trustees select other Christian men and women as administrators and teachers. More than 400 capable Christian men and women are now employed as teachers in these seven colleges. They are chosen for their personal Christian dedication, their intellectual honesty, their educational preparation, and their ability to teach. Some of the teachers in the Junior Colleges are receiving a salary less than \$3,400 per year.

The 7,634 students in these seven colleges are provided the finest educational environment for young people coming from a Christian background. In such an environment young Christian develop more completely and non-Christian are more readily helped educationally and personally.

Thus far we have thought of ourselves as North Carolina Baptists. Now let us conclude this report with a reference to ourselves as Baptists within the Sandy Run Association. What can we as pastors and leaders in our churches do to encourage our people to support our Baptist Colleges?

1. We can urge the members of our local churches to seek accurate information concerning the work of our colleges through our Baptist publications - Biblical Recorder, Charity and Children, and college publications - along with the daily and weekly press reports.
2. We can support our college leaders with our prayers, and we can invite them to preach and speak in our local churches, and at associational meetings.
3. We can encourage and support our own young people who are enrolled in our Baptist Colleges with our prayers and with our money, and we can invite them to speak in our local churches.
4. We can give of our money through the Cooperative Program, and include in our calendar of activities for this new church year a Special Gift on Father's Day for Christian Education.
5. We can encourage boys and girls graduating from High School to consider attending a Baptist College.

As Baptists, we must keep our Colleges and our Colleges must keep our Confidence, our Love, and our Support.

REPORT ON THE MUSIC MINISTRY

We appreciate the privilege of ministering to the churches of our Association through our Music Program. The following activities were conducted during the past year.

4. A music conference for all music directors, song leaders, organists and pianists was held at the Adaville Church.
5. Supplied music for the Evangelistic Crusade Rally and breakfast meetings.
6. Promoted the State Choir Festival Program.
7. The Associational music officers conducted two schools of music for Green River Association. We plan to have a school of music in our Association, January 26-30.

The Associational officers recommend that each church include in their literature order sufficient copies of the Church Musician for each choir.

The Report on the Homes for the Aging was given by Rev. Furman Harvey. Rev. Charles P. Burchette, Jr. of the staff of the Homes for the Aging spoke to the report. It was adopted as follows:

BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

Our Baptist Homes for the Aging had their beginning with Resthaven, being opened March 16, 1951. In December, 1953 Albemarle opened the Administration Building and Winston-Salem in June of 1957. These three have facilities to care for 119 counting residents and helpers. The average number of residents will exceed 100.

Efforts are now being utilized to raise \$100,000 to match a gift of \$50,000 offered by Mr. Don G. Matthews to build a fourth home, to be located at Hamilton, Martin County. The campaign is expected to be successfully completed by the end of the year.

The homes have had a successful year financially. During the year 1957, receipts were \$268,924.58. When the new administration building was entered, \$103,000 was borrowed to pay for construction and equipment. All of this has been repaid except \$20,000. Special day offerings and Co-operative Program gifts have helped meet current cost of operation. The largest individual gift for the year was \$40,000. The Sandy Run Association has 30 churches to contribute to the Homes with gifts amounting to \$784.06. However, less than 10% of the residents have given the homes enough to pay for the cost of their care.

The challenge to 850,000 Baptists of our State is great. The number of aging friends are increasing and of this number become invalids at the rate of 10% each year. This demands more infirmary space for these people. The home space for these who are invalid residents is about half enough. Will you pray and give that this need may be supplied?

The Baptist Homes for the Aging wish to express their gratitude for Baptists of North Carolina for what they have done and request your continued support and prayers.

Rev. L. H. Hollingsworth, President of the General Board of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention spoke on the work of the Committee of 25. There were 559 registered messengers and visitors on the first day. The meeting was adjourned to meet with Walls Church the following day.

SECOND DAY

The second day's session, which met at Walls Baptist Church, was opened by the assembly singing "Blessed Be The Name" led by Edwin Chenoweth. Rev. Harold Wilson led the worship period.

There was no Brotherhood Report given and the work of this organization can be studied in the Statistical table on the Brotherhood.

The Associational Missionary, Rev. W. Van Carroll, presented his report and it was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

The report on associational missions this year is good in some respects and could be better in some respects. Our greatest number of baptisms reported in any year was in 1954 when 637 were reported. This year we had only 542. Our greatest Sunday School enrolment was 15,263 in 1954. This year it was 14,788. 56 churches reported a Vacation Bible School with an enrolment of 5,645, our best record. Our 4,071 in Training Union was down a little. In 1955 our W. M. U. enrolment was 4,943. This year it was 3,067. Out total gifts to missions this year, \$140,917.00 were 9,659.00 more than last year, and, so far as we know, 9,659.00 more than we have ever given. That increase was mostly through the Cooperative Program.

July 21-24 we had an Associational R. A. Camp at Gardner-Webb College with 133 enrolled. Also, we had two weeks of Schools of Missions, September 7-19, with 18 churches participating the first week and 17 the second week with State, Home and Foreign missionaries speaking.

Another important thing, the latter part of the year the Association purchased for an associational parsonage the Dan Smith house at 600 E. Main St., Forest City.

The associational missionary's report of activities is as follows: visited in 139 services; delivered 46 sermons and addresses; taught 23 Sunday School Classes; held 260 conferences; attended 52 associational meetings; also, attended 18 meetings outside our association including Baptist State Convention, a week at Caswell, three days of Home Missions week at Ridgecrest, and participating in two Schools of Missions and a Training Union Enlargement Campaign; published six issues of bulletins and mailed 4,090 copies; mailed 2,653 letters and cards; and traveled 8,300 miles.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

As we "labor together with God" our watchword for this year tells us to "Sing unto the Lord, bless his name, show forth his salvation from day to day". Psalm 96:2.

The object of Woman's Missionary Societies is to promote christian missions through a program of mission study, prayer, community missions,

stewardship and missionary education of youth. We report 153 organizations with 3,067 members and 3 new organizations during the year. 153 mission study books were taught and 970 read approved books. 654 of our women receive Royal Service. 145 young women subscribe to "The Window of Y. W. A.", 373 Girl's Auxiliaries get "Tell" and 86 Sunbeam Activities.

We report 95 organizations observing Foreign Mission Week of Prayer last December and giving \$8,071.11 for the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. 78 observed Home Mission Week of Prayer in March and gave \$1,976.83 for the Annie Armstrong Offering. 94 observed season of Prayer for State Missions and a church-wide offering.

Christian witness'ing to W. M. U. members has long been called community missions. We are glad to report 108 organizations participating in planned community missions.

Our stewardship emphasis has always been the stewardship of possessions. We have 1,185 tithers and teach the wise use of the nine-tenths. 2,213 regularly gave through the Cooperative Program. We report 19 full graded unions and 320 new members. We have 15 churches with no missionary organization of any kind. May we work, pray, and witness cooperatively to enlist each one into this great task that is before us as we "study to show ourselves approved unto God a workman that needeth not to be ashamed rightly dividing the word of truth".

The report on Minister Retirement Plan was given at this time by Rev. Charles Ginn because the representative from Children's Home had been delayed. This report was adopted.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

Since its organization 40 years ago, the Relief and Annuity Board has paid out benefits totaling nearly \$27 million. In 1957 alone, \$2,245,861.18 in benefits was received by more than 5,000 retired or disabled ministers and denominational leaders and widows.

At the close of 1957, there were approximately 17,500 active members in the Board's various retirement plans, with nearly 20,500 churches, Boards and agencies cooperating. During the year, membership in the plans increased by 2,454.

Each year continues to show an increase in the number of retirement, disability and widow annuities. Last year 503 persons were added to the Board's annuity roll, 136 more than the previous year.

The Board's financial security is dependent on the work of the Investment Department. It is this department's duty to safeguard and increase by interest additions, the funds belonging to members of the retirement plans. Last year, 97.55% of the Board's total assets were invested for this purpose. Because of the splendid program of investments, the Board was able to add an additional credit of $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1% to all the Board's reserves at the end of 1957. The basic rate of interest is 3%.

Total membership in both Ministers Retirement Plan and Southern Baptist Protection Plan now stands at 1,026. This means that about 35% of our possibilities is covered in our plans.

We are encouraged with the year's progress but urge all pastors and workers to lead their churches to participation.

Rev. Dwight Watts gave the report on Children's Home and Dr. W. R. Wagoner, General Superintendent of Baptist Children's Home, spoke to this report which was adopted.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

June 30, 1958 marked the culmination of 15 years of progressive leadership by W. C. Reed with the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. After serving as Superintendent of Kennedy Home for seven years, Mr. Reed moved to Thomasville where he served as General Superintendent for eight years. At present North Carolina Baptists probably provide more services for dependent children than any other similar group in America. Those associated with our child care program have, in the 73 years of its history, developed a program which is recognized as one of the best in the nation.

Dr. W. R. Wagoner, of North Wilkesboro, was elected by the trustees to succeed Dr. Reed. Dr. Wagoner assumed his duties July 1.

The year 1957-58 has been a fruitful one in expanding services. Since October 1, 1957, North Carolina Baptists have directly served a grant total of 793 children. In addition to these, our social workers have been able to place with relatives or other agencies more than 200 children where their needs are now being met. Each application has been investigated by our case workers. During the past year we were able to admit about one-fourth of the applicants as compared with one-fifth admitted in 1956. Through the dedicated resourcefulness of our social workers, many homes were re-established while others were saved from breaking.

Last year's report pointed up the need for expanding our Foster Homes and for the care of the Indian children at Pembroke. The Baptist State Convention at its annual meeting last November voted unanimously to accept the recommendation of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Children's Homes and to make the Odum Home at Pembroke a part of the North Carolina Baptist Child Care Program.

North Carolina Baptists have two sources for supporting the Children's Homes:

SOURCE NUMBER 1 is a combination of the Once-A-Month Offering and the Cooperative Program. Through this plan the Homes receive a fixed amount. This cannot be increased or decreased except by vote of the Convention.

SOURCE NUMBER II is the Thanksgiving Offering. Every dollar marked "Thanksgiving Offering" comes to the Children's Homes. Last year we asked for an increase of 10 per cent in the Thanksgiving Offering. The churches responded with a 15 per cent increase. We have confidence that North Carolina Baptists will continue to remember deserving children at Thanksgiving with a generous offering.

In the absence of Mrs. J. E. Cargill, Rev. L. W. Cain read her prepared report on Home Missions and it was adopted.

HOME MISSION REPORT

Money does not win people to Christ, but money in the hands of an agency which carefully selects missionaries for the job, means missions. Thus the Home Mission Board serves in co-operation with Southern Baptists. It is the very great task of this Board to take the resources in money and personnel provided by our Baptist members, and channel those resources where they will count for the most for Christ's kingdom. If you would know of some of the marvelous achievements of this evangelistic agency since 1845, read "History of the Home Mission Board", by Dr. J. B. Lawrence. It is then that you will realize what an investment we have made in missions. (How many baptisms can be placed to your credit and to mine?) Truly, an indescribable satisfaction wells up in our hearts as we place our money in the offering plates--realizing the small part we have in this glorious accomplishment for our Master.

With these remarks to center our interest on Home Missions, let us consider briefly a few pertinent facts about "Home Missions in Action". Since 1956 the Board along with all Southern Baptists and seven other American Baptist Conventions has been concentrating specifically on the Advance Program. Definite objectives have been outlined, and much progress has already been observed. The little publication "Do You Know" from the Home Mission Board states some very vital facts as proof of this. Time and space will not permit giving all of the eighty-one facts. In 1957 there were 141 loans made for church buildings. These loans totaled \$1,764,391.00. In this year of 1958, there has been available for borrowing the total amount of \$7,464,578.47. Through the Twin Miracles--the Co-operative Program and the Annie Armstrong Offering--the mission message is reaching multitudes. By our supporting and contributing to these two

offerings, along with our prayers, we have helped Home missionaries this year to win nearly 40,000 people to the Lord--as well as to establish 1,000 new missions and churches.

What of the challenges for next year--for the next five years? At least 60 million people in our Convention territory are lost. The Board now has a mission force of 1,271, exclusive of summer workers. By the close of 1964, it is hoped this number will be increased to 2,000. We, as Southern Baptists, are called upon to recognize the size and urgency of our home mission task--and to pledge anew our prayers and support in meeting the challenge for the 1959 Evangelistic Crusade.

Rev. C. C. Crow presented the report on Foreign Missions, which was adopted as follows:

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

In churches, colleges, seminaries and in meetings of conventions and assemblies all through the year hundreds of young people have dedicated themselves to go--wherever God may lead. There are now more young people in touch with the Foreign Mission Board than ever before.

It has been an outstanding feature in the appointment of missionaries that so many have come from places of responsible leadership in pastorates, schools and medical service. They have turned aside from opportunities that might challenge them at home and have surrendered to go to meet larger needs on mission fields.

Yet with all of this interest and dedication the actual number who are appointed does not come up to the expectations and desire of the Foreign Mission Board. Some of the volunteers do not qualify for actual appointment. Then, too, in some areas of the mission field from one-fourth to one-third of the missionaries are on furlough. This reduces the actual personnel far below the need and call. For in all the places where our missionaries have gone there is the call "Send us more missionaries". "How long must we wait?" "Why did you not come sooner?" We now project work in 38 different countries of the globe. But there are millions who have never yet heard the message of Jesus and His love. In many of these countries only 1 to 2 per cent have the evangelical message. Surely we can't ignore the command of Jesus "Go ye into all the World and preach the gospel to every creature".

There are some imperative demands upon every Southern Baptist in the spread of the gospel to the whold world. We can support the Foreign Missionary effort with our prayers and with our regular support to the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

As we go forth this year let us remember that Jesus said "Ye are my witnesses." And, too, that His program begins here, in Jerusalem, and reaches out to the farthest point of the world.

The Missionary Sermon was given by Rev. Zeb Moss, present Pastor of Caroleen Church and a Mission Volunteer for Foreign Service. Another bountiful lunch was served by the Host Church.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The final session was opened by the Assembly singing "Amazing

Grace" led by W. C. Giles. Rev. Harold Brown led the worship service.

The Moderator recognized two new pastors who were not present the first day, Rev. W. W. Abernathy, who will become pastor of Walls Church November 1, and Rev. Dean Simpson, Green Creek.

The American Bible Society Report was given by Rev. Dean Simpson and was adopted as follows:

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

In spite of all that work contrary to it, the Holy Bible still stands alone and supreme, doing the ancient job assigned to it by divine hands. In a super-modern world the ancient word still echoes and re-echoes down the corridors of time. Since the first printed Bible was lifted tenderly from movable type in 1456 by John Gutenberg, over one billion copies of the ancient word of God have been printed. The American Bible Society stands out singularly for having published over 500,000,000 of them. The Herculean task of translating the world's languages, so that the world's blind might see has been carried out in 1,127 languages of the world. The American Bible Society has translated the scriptures in every language from Zulu to Miskito, a little dialect spoken by 25,000 people in Central America. The silent missionary still speaks, and once having spoken continues to set souls on fire. In far flung corners whose darkness is sealed in by the iron curtains of Communism, the candle of the Bible, its own missionary continues to flicker and to burn in such places as Russia, China and the other satelites.

The primary work of the Society is the distribution of Bibles, which it distributes at the rate of 15,000,000 per year. Where possible Bibles are sold, it being the belief that we work the hardest to possess what has cost us something. Often the impoverished world is not able to pay even the modest cost which the society charges, so they are, of course, given gratis. When sold, however, they sell for prices below the cost of production: English gospels sell for .02, New Testament for .15, and Bibles for .75. Without exception, the King James Version is used.

The report of the Nominating Committee was given by Rev. W. F. Woodall and was adopted. This report is included in the Associational Directory of these minutes.

The Assembly sang, "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes" and a quartet from Walls Church sang "At Calvary".

Rev. J. R. Featherstone, Chairman of Evangelism, gave his report and it was adopted. Dr. Julian S. Hopkins, State Secretary of Evangelism, spoke to the report.

EVANGELISM REPORT

Evangelism is the heart of God's work on earth. It must ever be in the foreground of all our endeavors in the churches and in the association if we follow the New Testament pattern. Every Christian's greatest privilege and responsibility is to let Jesus Christ work in and through us to evangelize the world. This is the Great Commission and to carry out the Great Commission is to do the work of evangelism.

All churches in the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina last year had a ratio of baptisms to membership of 1 to 25. This means that on an average last year it took 25 church members a whole year to win one person to Christ. This record isn't anything that it should be, but it does represent an increase in baptisms of 4% over the preceding year. Total baptisms reported in the state in 1956 were 32,468, and in 1957 they were 33,796.

In the Sandy Run Association last year the ratio of baptisms to membership was 32 to 1. Total baptisms reported in our association in 1957 were 579. This year the churches reported 542 baptisms. This represents a loss of 37 under 1957 or 34 to win 1. This ought not to be.

Next year we face an unparalleled opportunity to lead all the people in the churches to engage in the total work of redemption by going all-the-way in cooperation in the continent-wide Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade. This Crusade will be the biggest concerted effort ever made to win the North American continent to Christ and to experience new depths of dedication to Christ on the part of all church members. Seven major Baptist conventions in the United States and Canada are cooperating in this Crusade. These conventions are composed of 75,000 churches which have 19,000,000 members. Here is an opportunity like we have never faced before to get into the stream of God's redeeming purpose. The date March 15-29, 1959 has been set for the Crusade in our Association.

THE CONSTITUTION

SANDY RUN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article I — Name

This body shall be known as the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

Article II — Membership

Sec. 1. The Association shall be composed of Baptist Churches of Rutherford County, Cleveland County and Polk County which are now members, and any other Baptist churches which may hereafter be admitted as provided.

Sec. 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented by her pastor and two representatives. Any church with more than fifty members shall be entitled to a messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. New churches may be admitted by a majority vote of messengers present after careful examination and found to be regular in their organization, orthodox in their doctrine, and supporting objects of the Association, State, and Southern Baptist Conventions. Churches are to be accepted under watchcare of the Association for a period of one year in order that the above may be determined.

Sec. 4. The Association may at any time dissolve connection with any church that becomes heterodox in doctrine or disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Sec. 5. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure.

Sec. 6. In case of internal dissention in a church and two parties coming up to the Association, each claiming to represent the church; neither party shall be seated as messengers until the question is decided as to which party is the church in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of messengers present.

Article III — Objects

The objects of the Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence, and spiritual power of the churches and to direct, promote, and develop their energies in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially

along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the State Baptist Convention, and the Association itself.

Article IV - Meetings

Sec. 1 The Association shall meet in annual session on Tuesday and Wednesday after the Second Sunday in October of each year. The Moderator shall call the body to meet in extra session if necessity shall arise.

Sec. 2 The Associational year shall begin October 1 of each year and close September 30 of the following year.

Article V - Officers and Duties

Sec. 1. The officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, and leaders of the organized work in the Association, who shall be chosen annually by a majority present.

Sec. 2. The officers shall perform all duties usually devolving upon such offices in well deliberative assemblies.

Sec. 3. The term of Moderator shall not exceed more than two consecutive years.

Sec. 4. The Missionary of the Sandy Run Baptist Association shall work with and assist the churches and missions of the Association in the promotion of their work and shall be under the supervision of the Associational Board.

Article VI - Associational Board

Sec. 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of the officers of the Association (Article V, Sec. 1) who shall also be the officers of this Board with the Moderator as chairman, the leader of each of the Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music,) the Associational Missionary (ex-officio), the Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative on the Baptist State Convention General Board, each active pastor, and two members selected by each active church of the Association.

Sec. 2. This body shall act for the Association in the interim between annual sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, neither taking any action contrary to the will of the Association, nor initiating any new policy or practice binding upon the Association unless specifically so directed. However, in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action so taken shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for its consideration.

Sec. 3. The Board shall be divided into committees with assigned duties (Article VII, Sec. 1.)

Sec. 4. The Clerk will make a report to the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 5. This body shall meet on Monday following the first Sunday in each quarter. The place may be decided.

Article VII - Committees and Their Duties

Sec. 1. ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD COMMITTEES. The Associational Board shall be divided by the Committee on Committees into the following committees with their duties.

I. ADVISORY STEERING COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Associational Missionary, the leader of each Associational Organization (Pastors' Conference, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music), Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative of the Baptist State Convention General Board, the Chairman of the Associational Board Committee 2-7, and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

- (1) To study and act upon any matters of business of the Associational Board between quarterly meetings of the Board. Any action taken shall be dependent upon the approval of the Associational Board.
- (2) To counsel and advise any committee or church in the Association on any suggestion that may be submitted to it.
- (3) To counsel, advise, and direct the Associational Missionary and recommend to the Associational Board any necessary changes in any phase of the work.
- (4) To assist the Associational Missionary in his work and, in event of his resignation, this Committee shall be responsible for finding and recommending a successor to the Associational Board.
- (5) To work with the Associational Missionary in formulating a calendar of activities for the Association.

2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. This Committee and its chairman, consisting of nine members, shall be appointed by the Moderator of the Association soon following the annual session of the Association. It shall, as soon as possible, meet and assign the members of the Associational Board to the various committees, naming the chairman of each except as otherwise provided, and name the Standing Committees and their chairman (Article VII, Sec. 2.) Also, it shall name any other committee assigned to it.

3. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM. This Committee shall be composed of the Associational Chairman of Evangelism and members assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings and organizations of the Association. It shall also encourage and help arrange revivals in every section of the Association and lead in simultaneous revivals. The chairmen will submit a written report to the annual session of the Association.

4. COMMITTEE ON ORDINATIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall serve in an advisory capacity when called upon to assist in the examination and ordination of deacons and candidates for the gospel ministry.

5. COMMITTEE ON LOCATION OF NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. Its duties shall be as follows:

- (1) Receive and consider any request by any group for a mission to be organized into a Baptist church and recommend action to the Associational Board.
- (2) Be alert to develop any lead that might be given toward the establishment of a new church or mission. Advise with the group, or groups, involved what steps should be taken in the location and organization of a mission or church.
- (3) Consider applications from any church or churches desiring membership in the Sandy Run Association and make recommendations to the Associational Board as to what action should be taken.

6. COMMITTEE ON FINANCES, BUDGET, AND AUDITING. This Committee shall be composed of the Treasurer as chairman, Moderator, S. S. Supt., T. U. Director, W. M. U. President, Brotherhood President, Church Music Director, and as many other members as the Committee on Committees may deem wise. This Committee shall prepare and recommend a budget for the Associational Program and suggest ways and means to the churches whereby the budget can be raised. It shall also be responsible for auditing the Treasurer's book.

7. COMMITTEE ON FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. The Committee on Committees shall appoint this Committee, naming the chairman, and assign as many members as it deems wise. It shall consider all church or mission requests for pastoral aid and requests to be made to the State or Home Mission Boards for aid or loans in buying church lots and shall make recommendations concerning them to the Associational Board.

8. COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS. This Committee and its chairman shall be named by the Committee on Committees. It shall bring a suitable report at the annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches to have died since the last annual session.

9. COMMITTEES TO REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL WORK. These are Committees on (1) State Missions, (2) Home Missions, (3) Foreign Missions, (4) Christian Literature, (5) Christian Education, (6) Children's Homes, (7) Homes for the Aging, (8) Baptist Hospital, (9) Relief and Annuity, (10) Temperance and Civic Righteousness, (11) Stewardship and (12) American Bible Society. These Committees and their chairmen, composed of not less than five members, shall be named by the Committee on Committees. Their duties shall be to inform our people about the work they are chosen to represent and lead in promoting it. The chairman of each Committee shall make a brief written report at the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 2. STANDING COMMITTEES. These Committees and their chairmen shall also be appointed by the Committee on Committees at the time the Associational Board Committees are appointed, but they are not necessarily composed of Board members. They shall serve through the annual session of the Association. These Committees are:

1. TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of five members and shall report at the annual session. It shall state the time of the next annual meeting of the Association (Article IV, Sec. 1) recommend the place or places of the meeting, and recommend the preacher and the alternate.

2. PROGRAM COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Associational Music Director, Associational Missionary, and host pastor or pastors. It shall prepare a printed program for the annual meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall in the opening of the annual meeting of the Association present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

3. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of five members. It shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it may deem expedient. Also, resolutions and recommendations presented at the annual session may be referred to this Committee.

4. NOMINATING COMMITTEE; This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall contact and nominate to the Associational Board in its last meeting before the annual session of the Association for election. all the leaders of Associational Organizations (S. S., T. U., W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music) so these leaders in turn can present their helpers to the

Association in annual session for election. The Committee shall also contact and nominate at the annual session of the Association all Associational Officers, (Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian) and the Chairman of Evangelism.

Article VIII - Trustees

Sec. 1. There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer.

Sec. 2. The Trustees and their chairman shall be appointed annually by the Committee on Committees at the time this Committee appoints the Associational Board Committees.

Sec. 3. Their duties shall be to hold title to property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association with the Association or Associational Board's fore-knowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution of the Association, and with State laws as they effect the Association.

Article IX

This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers in attendance, provided that notice is given and the proposed amendment is stated during the first day, but no vote shall be taken upon the proposed amendment until the afternoon session of the second day.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with song and prayer.

2. The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association. He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise provided for.

3. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be considered an authority in all cases not provided for in the Rules of Order: "but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the Presiding Officer may use his discretion subject to an appeal to the Association."

4. Brethren invited to sit with us shall have the liberty of discussion, but not of voting.

5. Speakers shall rise and address the Moderator, and shall confine themselves to the subject under discussion. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the Association.

6. No question shall be discussed without a motion thereon first being made and seconded. Motions made and seconded shall be stated by the Moderator previous to any discussion thereon. If motion contains two or more parts, it shall be divided at the request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote of the body.

ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD REPORT

The report of the Associational Board of the Sandy Run Association was presented by Miss Martha Jean McFarland, Clerk, and was adopted as follows:

The following is an abridged report but giving the important transactions of the Associational Board for the year:

On October 28, 1958, the Board heard the reports of the various organizations and committees. This being the meeting following the annual session of the Association, the Committee on Committees reported having divided the General Board members into the various committees as called for by the Constitution, which report was adopted.

The Committee on Financial Assistance recommended that Harmon Street and Faith Churches receive \$672.00 and \$384.00 respectively from the State Mission Board for the year. The recommendation was adopted.

On January 12, 1959, the Board in session authorized the Moderator to appoint a committee of three to supervise some minor interior remodeling and redecorating of the Associational Parsonage but not to spend over \$300.00. Rev. Coit Auten, Mrs. C. G. Toms and Mrs. Thurman Wall were appointed on this committee.

A motion was carried that the Association work out arrangements with the Florence Church to employ a secretary together, the Association using her about one-fourth of the time and paying \$15.00 per week salary.

A motion was also passed that \$1000.00 be taken from the general associational fund and applied on the payment due on the Associational Parsonage.

A motion was passed, authorizing the borrowing of \$7,500.00 from the First Federal Savings & Loan Association of Forest City, N. C., and that the Trustees of the Association secure the payment of said loan of \$7,500.00 by executing to the First Federal Savings & Loan Association a Deed of Trust against the Associational Parsonage at 600 East Main Street, Forest City, N. C.

On April 6, 1959, it was reported to the Board that the Florence Church and the Sandy Run Association had employed Miss Martha Jean McFarland as Secretary.

Our Associational Clerk, Rev. Coit Auten, having left the Association, the Board elected Miss McFarland as Associational Clerk to work under the supervision of the Associational Missionary with the understanding that this be considered a part of the Associational Secretary's responsibility.

A motion was carried that the fire insurance bill on the Associational Parsonage be paid.

Moderator Lowe informed the Board that \$1,000.00 was paid on the Associational Parsonage last fall when it was bargained for, that \$1,500.00 was paid early this year when the property was turned over to the Association, and that the \$7,500.00 the Association owes on the Parsonage had been borrowed from the First Federal Savings & Loan Association. He stated that B. T. Jones, attorney for the Loan Company, drew up the papers free of charge and that the Association is paying \$75.00 per month on the Parsonage.

On July 6, 1959, the Associational Board met in regular session and heard the reports from the leaders who were present representing the various associational organizations.

Mr. P. B. Price, the treasurer, stated that there were 12 churches that had not contributed, to the Associational Program.

On September 21, 1959, The Associational Board held its quarterly meeting.

Since the roof of the Associational Parsonage had been leaking, the Advisory Steering Committee had employed Mr. Buren Walker on an hourly and material basis to put on a new roof which the Board approved.

The Nominating Committee's report for leaders of the associational organizations for another year was adopted as follows: for Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Rev. Dwight Watts; for Associational Training Union Director; Mr. Z. W. Jolley; for Associational Brotherhood President, Rev. Joe Bridges; for Associational Music Director, Mr. Edwin Chenoweth; and for Associational W. M. U. President, Mrs. J. E. Cargill.

Rev. Malvin C. Swicegood, new pastor of the Bostic Church, and Rev. L. N. Epley, new pastor of the Hick's Grove Church, were recognized.

The Associational Training Union Leadership School, scheduled for September 28-October 1, was announced and attendance was stressed.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

Mr. Sam Jenkins, Trinity Church, presented the report on State Missions and E. Cleve Wilkie, General Missionary of the Baptist State Convention, spoke to the report, which was adopted as follows:

STATE MISSIONS is the missionary effort on the part of North Carolina Baptists to reach the unsaved for Christ and teach, enlist, and train the saved in giving, living, and serving through the churches and throughout the world.

(1) More than 60 per cent of the people of North Carolina, above eight years of age are lost. North Carolina, therefore, is not half Christian.

(2) We have over 880,000 Baptist Church members in North Carolina, but 60 per cent of our church constituency is not dedicated in the Christian profession. In this undeveloped area, the churches have their primary challenge.

(3) The above interpretation of the purpose and challenge of State Missions demands a varied program of mission activity.

A. Our people need to be taught and trained. Therefore, many of the significant phases of our State Missions' work are promoted through the Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Royal Ambassadors, Church Development, and Music Departments. Over 2,800 Vacation Bible Schools will be reported for 1959 with \$50,000 given to World Missions. Approximately 5,000 of our Baptist people attended Training Union weeks at Caswell, Fruitland, and Ridgecrest this summer. The R.A.Camps were full. The Church Development Department has enlisted many new, rural and urban churches in our Baptist program of stewardship and organizational life.

B. Since 60 per cent of the people in North Carolina are lost -- they need the Saviour. State Missions provides a Department of Evangelism that seeks to inspire pastors and churches to evangelize their communities. Since the organization of this department, baptisms have greatly increased.

C. A growing population demands new and stronger churches. State Missions provide a necessary and significant ministry through aid on some church buildings and the purchase of sites for new churches and some one hundred or more salaries for pastors. During the past year approximately \$150,000 was invested in this work. Requests for lot aid already in 1959 amount to \$100,000.

D. A more highly developed and intelligent congregation demands a better trained pastor. Pastors' Schools are promoted through State Missions to meet this growing demand. Last year hundreds of pastors and their wives received better training at Fruitland and Mars Hill.

E. The colored races in our midst constitute a large percentage of our population. State missions seeks to minister to these through the Department of Interracial cooperation. Our main emphasis is helping to train their leadership.

F. Other areas of need constantly challenge the resources of State Missions; namely:

(a) The Christian Action League. This organization is doing a tremendous job in helping to produce a sober and sane citizenship in North Carolina.

(b) The Silent People. Three thousand of them beckon for our care, love and concern.

(c) Caswell Assembly and Fruitland Camp. Approximately 8,000 people attended these assemblies this summer. Many decisions for Christ and full-time Christian vacations are made.

(d) Other ministries: Summer Student Work, Ministry Through Service Institutions, Separation of Church and State and Pastoral Care.

G. The Department of Church Planning. This department serves many churches through counsel and guidance in planning for beautiful and adequate churches and educational buildings.

H. Brotherhood and Royal Ambassador Work are great departments of service to the men and boys of our churches.

I. Our Church and denominational leaders of tomorrow need to be taught and trained in cooperation and loyalty now. State Missions promotes a Baptist Student program among 22,000 sons and daughters from our Baptist homes who are attending the many colleges or universities, business, medical and nursing schools of our State. Two years ago the Convention purchased a beautiful site for a student center at the University of North Carolina where we have 1,900 Baptist students; and one this past year at Greensboro, near Woman's College. More are planned for in the future.

The budget for State Missions this year, including an overdraft, is \$627,000. This does not include the \$85,000 on lot request.

If we meet the requests on church lots and pastoral aid already in for 1959, the budget would require \$707,000. However, the total State Missions' needs within the budget are \$627,000. The goal for State Missions' Day on September 20 is \$186,000.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE REPORT

The report on Christian Literature was given by Rev. Ed White and was spoken to by C. W. Bazemore, Associate Editor of the Biblical Recorder. The report was adopted as follows:

"Give attention to reading," said the Apostle Paul, in writing to Timothy. In that day, the people had no newspapers, no magazines, no printing presses. But they had to read to find truth. Never before has there been so much to read, as we have today. Much of this flood of reading matter is bad; so Christian people must continually cast aside the evil and turn to that which is good. The Bible, of course, occupies first place always as we read in search for truth. All Christian literature must forever be dedicated to the furtherance of the Gospel, or it fails in its noble purpose.

The flood of obscene, degrading literature has become so heavy on newsstands and in the mails, that the U. S. Post Office Department has cracked down on its nation-wide efforts to break it up. The printed page has great power for good; and also great power for evil. Money-hungry publishers without Christian motives are pouring out obscene printed matter like a stream of poison to capture the minds of all who will stop, look, and read.

Baptists have no need to buy or read such literature, for they have an immense volume of clean, uplifting Christian literature coming from Baptist presses and other sources to suit every age and need.

"The promotion of missions, education, social service, and the distribution of sound religious literature" was the main purpose of the Baptist State Convention of N. C. when it was organized in 1830. In 1833 the BIBLICAL RECORDER was founded to help carry out these noble aims of our Baptist forefathers. Since that time, the RECORDER has carried in its pages the Baptist message in North Carolina. It ought to be in every Baptist home in our State. No Baptist mailbox is beyond the reach of the State Baptist paper each week, for every copy is mailed directly to each subscriber in every case.

Brethren, the RECORDER has three subscription plans as you know. The circulation is now over 62,000, but it ought to be twice that, and it will be soon if our church leaders will push it. Then we would have a much better informed membership, for on the wings of the RECORDER pages, the progress, growth, and witness of Baptist are borne.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

In the absence of Rev. Harold Brown, the Baptist Hospital Report was presented by Rev. C. C. Crow. The report was spoken to by Dr. W. K. McGee, Baptist Hospital. It was adopted as follows:

Our Baptist Hospital seeks to serve our people with a complete program of specialized medical care for all who need it. Our people go in great numbers, with all types of serious illness, from all walks of life, and in all financial circumstances, to receive the ministry of our Baptist medical center. A constant effort is made to keep it personal and Christian in its care of sick people.

Last year Service Patients from 95 counties of the State made over 66,000 visits to the 31 clinics of the Out-Patient Department which is open to families not able to pay the full cost of their medical care. About the same number of office visits was made by Private or full-pay patients. More than 16,000 sick persons were hospitalized for 132,000 days of bed care.

Forty per cent of the hospital service is rendered the patients who go to the Out-Patient Clinics or who enter the hospital through the Out-Patient Department. The services of the physicians are free to all these patients, but the hospital charges must be paid unless other arrangements are made by the family.

Last year the hospital spent well over one million dollars in the care of these Service Patients. The Mother's Day Fund, along with the welfare funds and assistance from other agencies and foundations, enables the hospital to provide more than half of this service free for our very poor people. The Mother's Day Fund alone, however, has not covered the full cost of the care of even the most needy.

We need to lay upon the hearts of our members the necessity of the Mothers' Day Fund, if our Baptist Hospital is to provide this important service for our poorer people.

HISTORIAN REPORT

The Historian's report was given by Rev. W. F. McGinnis and was adopted as follows:

Since so many of our Sandy Run churches did not report any historical events and activities, we feel sure that this report is far short of the full facts of progress for the year.

The incidents which have been reported relative to the history and progress of the churches are as follows:

I. Construction

The Adaville Church paid off the indebtedness on the sanctuary and built a new three-story, 62' X 40', educational building at a cost of \$35,000.00. Also, they erected a bulletin board on the lawn. The Bethany Church voted to build a parsonage. The Bethel Church built a new sanctuary. The Big Springs Church hard-surfaced the parking area. The Camp's Creek people held their first service in their new church plant on April 12, 1959. Gantt's Grove has five Sunday School rooms under construction. Glenwood built two Sunday school rooms in the basement of the parsonage. The Green Creek Church hard-surfaced the parking area. The Gray's Creek added several rooms to the educational plant. The Harris Church built a baptismal pool. The Mt. Pleasant Church (C) built a parsonage. The Pore's Ford Church added five Sunday school rooms. The Prospect Church began an educational building with 8,000 square feet of floor space. The Shiloh Church greatly enlarged her educational building and installed a new heating system.

II. Improvements

Adaville renovated sanctuary, inside and out. Bethel beautified grounds. Caroleen did some repair work on church building and parsonage. First Broad put running water in church building and improved church grounds. Glenwood organized three choirs and purchased 36 Baptist Hymnals. Green Creek bought a Hammond Organ. Harmon Street paid for two lots and dedicated the land. Prospect renovated the sanctuary and parsonage and installed a gas furnace in the church. Sandy Mush purchased a \$2,695.00 piano and a \$2,774.00 Hammond Organ. The Sandy Run Association purchased an associational parsonage.

Brief histories of the Host Churches were prepared by the Historian as follows:

FIRST BAPTIST

The First Baptist Church of Forest City was organized as Cool Springs Church in December, 1848, with seventeen charter members. The present beautiful church building is the fourth to be erected in the history of the church. The first church was built of logs. In the year 1867 the second house of worship was built. This building was used until 1889, when a brick church, said to be the first brick church built in Forest City, was constructed where the parsonage now stands. The lot was donated by Rev. J. H. Yarboro, who served the church as pastor on three different occasions.

In the church records of February 22, 1889, the following entry is found: "Motion to move into new church house in Forest City. Motion carried." It was at this time that the name of the church was changed from Cool Springs to Forest City.

Construction of the present church building was begun in 1913 and the work was completed early in 1915. This church was erected under splendid leadership of Pastor J. Q. Adams and the following building Committee:

J. F. Alexander, Chairman; Dr. W. C. Bostic, Vice-Chairman; C. A. Wilkie, W. L. Horn, T. R. Padgett, J. V. Ware, J. C. Scruggs, R. L. Reinhardt, J. A. Wilkie, J. B. Harrill, A. B. Flack, W. S. Moss, J. T. Fortune, J. B. Long and D. O. Brackett. This beautiful building was made possible through the generosity of the late Dr. G. E. Young and the late J. F. Alexander, who offered to pay one-half of the cost of the new building, provided the membership would meet the other half. The proposition was accepted and the building erected and paid for in that manner. Dr. Young and Mrs. Alexander included in their part the donation of the lot on which the church and educational buildings are located, adjoining the property donated by Rev. J. H. Yarboro, on which the parsonage is located.

The congregation met in the new church for the first time on February 21, 1915, the occasion being a special dedicatory service, and the sermon was by the late Dr. Livingston Johnson of Raleigh.

The church parsonage was built in 1923. The Sunday School and educational building, known as the Alexander Memorial Building, in memory of Mr. Alexander, was constructed in 1926.

The church has been served by the following dedicated pastors: Rev. William Harrill, 1848-1867; Rev. J. H. Yarboro, 1867-1869; Rev. A. McMahan, 1869-1871; Rev. T. B. Justice, 1871-1874; Rev. A. McMahan, 1874-1875; Rev. H. D. Harrill, 1875-1876; Rev. Wade Hill, 1876-1879; Rev. A. L. Stough, 1879-1881; Rev. J. H. Yarboro, 1881-1883; Rev. G. W. Rollins, 1883-1884; Rev. C. B. Justice, 1884-1885; Rev. T. Bright, 1885-1889; Rev. J. H. Yarboro, 1889-1890; Rev. G. W. Rollins, 1890-1891; Rev. F. C. Hickson, 1891-1892; Rev. Z. D. Harrill, 1892-1895; Rev. F. C. Hickson, 1895-1900; Rev. M. M. Landrum, 1901-1903; Rev. R. A. Hedgepath, 1903-1904; Rev. Walter Wolson, 1905-1906; Rev. J. Q. Adams, 1906-1911; Rev. J. M. Hamrick, 1911-1912; Rev. J. Q. Adams, 1912-1919; Rev. S. N. Watson, 1919-1922; Dr. W. A. Ayers, 1923-1943; Rev. W. E. Pettit, 1944-1947; Dr. H. H. Stembridge, Jr., 1947-1957; and Rev. D. Hoke Coon, 1957--.

BETHEL

Bethel Baptist Church was constituted in 1847 at Ellenboro, N. C., with nineteen members. The first church building was constructed of logs. The church built its second house of worship, a frame building, in the year 1881.

Bethel was a member of the Broad River Association and later joined the Kings Mountain Association, and in 1890 the Sandy Run Association was organized in this church of which it is now a member.

The third house of worship, a brick building, was built in 1921, and the present Bethel church was built in the Fall of 1958.

The church now has 580 members with a Sunday School enrollment of 421.

The following pastors have served the church: Elder William Harrill, Dove Pannell, William McSwain, J. H. Yarboro, T. J. Campbell, J. J. Jones, A. A. McSwain, A. P. Hollifield, Z. D. Harrill, G. M. Webb, G. W. Rollins, B. M. Bridges, R. L. Limerick, B. M. Hamrick, D. J. Hunt, I. D. Harrill, C. L. Taylor, W. W. Davidson, C. F. Laughlin, Charles Hamrick and the present pastor, Harold Brown.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The sixty-one churches and one mission of the Sandy Run Association with 14,788 enrolled, constitute an important ministry, reaching people through the local church to teach them God's word. Jesus said to us, "Go and teach all nations to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

The following meetings were held this year: The Associational Officers Planning meeting with Mr. Richard Smith planning the work for the new year. Before each Associational Sunday School meeting the officers met to plan the meeting for our Associational Sunday School. The Associational Sunday School meetings were held in the following churches: Mt. Pleasant (C), Florence, Trinity, Bethel, Cliffside, and Race Path. These were very helpful meetings to all churches attending.

This year proved to be a good Vacation Bible School year for our Association. Fifty-nine schools out of sixty-one churches and one mission. It is hoped that next year we can be 100%. This year in April two very helpful V. B. S. Clinics were held on April 23 at Cliffside and on April 24 at Florence.

The Group Training Schools were held again this year with schools at Trinity, Florence, Shiloh. Besides these schools there were many more conducted by the different churches. There were 1,199 training awards earned this year.

This year in our Association we have one Standard School, Florence.

The Sunday School in years past has done a wonderful job, but the Sunday School of tomorrow must even do better. With trained and dedicated personnel we can this next year have the greatest Sunday School year in our history. May I challenge each of you to work and work hard for the time will come and is near at hand when no man can work. God bless your church.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

The year of 1959 has been a good year in Training Union work. The theme, "Thou Art the Christ", which was followed for the year was presented at "M" Night at the Cliffside Church, at which time 902 came to hear Dr. Carlyle Marney of Myers Park Baptist Church, Charlotte, North Carolina, our guest speaker.

On November 17, 1958 a clinic for Church Officers and Committees was held at the Florence Church. A total of 117 was present. This unique clinic provided specific training for clerks, treasurers, ushers, deacons, committee members (nominating, pulpit, Lord's Supper, etc.) which had not been offered before. This was well received by those attending and it is hoped that it can become an annual clinic sponsored by the Training Union Department and will prove to give valuable assistance to all the churches.

The Training Union Tournaments were held at the Race Path Church on March 30. We had a good representation in each and had a participant from each department who was eligible to participate in the Regional Tournaments at Alexis. More of our churches should enter into this phase of the Training Union work and realize some of the dividends it pays to the church member. Being able to use the Word of God is a vital part of church membership and Christian growth.

Four new Training Unions have been organized--Harris, Riverside, Mt. View Mission, and Pore's Ford, leaving only eleven churches without Training Union. Every church should be training its members in Christian service.

The most successful Youth Night in our Association was held April 11, 1959 at Bethel Church in Ellenboro. Rev. John Lawrence of Shelby was guest speaker and the Gardner-Webb College choir was featured on the program. The hearts of the young people were inspired to better living by Rev. Lawrence's message on "We Would See Jesus."

The high-light of the year was the Central Leadership Study Course held at Florence Church from September 28 through October 2. We were very fortunate in having Mr. James Morgan and his corp of state workers to lead in this school. With this school for workers coming at the beginning of a new year, we are looking forward to hearing reports from each church that 1960 is the best year ever in Training Union.

BAPTIST COLLEGES REPORT

In this report we are considering Christian Education in terms of our seven Baptist Colleges in North Carolina. The term, Christian Education, also includes many other educational and training activities in our local churches.

Our seven Baptist Colleges, namely Wake Forest, Chowan, Mars Hill, Campbell, Wingate, Meredith and Gardner-Webb constitute a program of higher education second only to Texas among all the states in our Southern Baptist Convention territory. Nearly 8,000 students are enrolled each year in our colleges. This is about one-eighth of all college students in North Carolina. The annual operating budgets total more than \$10,000.00, of which our Baptist people, through church offerings, provide approximately five per cent. Students, through tuition and fees, pay approximately 60 per cent and the remaining 35 per cent comes from endowment and gifts. If it were possible for our colleges to apply the total of approximately \$1,000,000 given through our churches to their operating costs, the present five per cent would become 10 per cent of the operating costs. It is hoped that this will be possible in the near future through some long-range Convention plan for meeting the capital needs of all institutions and agencies, thereby leaving income from Cooperative Program and special offerings for current operating needs.

Perhaps the most significant development in the work of our colleges in this present year is the action of our Baptist people in adopting the report of the Convention Committee of Twenty-five. It is very important that our people read this report carefully as it relates to our colleges, It does not recommend the addition of any new college at present, but it emphasizes the necessity for our recognizing the increasing demands upon our colleges which can be met only through growth in all respects. The Committee recommends that consideration be given to the possibility of changing the status of some of the two-year colleges to four year colleges, and already progress is being made in this respect.

Our Baptist Colleges are faced with the competition of all other colleges in both the quality of their work and the growing cost of operation and expansion. Our college young people need the best, and they need all that is expected in a college community.

As Baptist church leaders and parents of these young people, we want our colleges to be Christian and to present a positive Christian witness at all times and in all respects; but we cannot stop here and expect to attract our young people. We must realize that such matters as costs, scholarships, athletics, etc., will be determining factors.

As Baptist, we must love our colleges to the point of understanding them and their importance in all departments of our work. If we love them and believe in them, we shall see that they are given sufficient money to become the kind of colleges that will attract our young people. We can't force young people to go unless they want to go. We must join hands with administration and faculty to make our colleges so attractive that they will be selected by our young people. As a denomination, our future will depend largely on the type of leadership we educate in our colleges.

It is our hope that the observance of Christian Education on Father's Day each year will help all of our Baptist people to have a better understanding concerning our colleges, and their importance in our work, as well as added financial aid to meet the increasing costs of operating our colleges.

It is our hope that we be alert in all of our Baptist churches to recognize and direct promising young people in to one of our Baptist colleges.

As pastors, parents, and church leaders, we should face these facts courageously and lead our people in meeting this great but not impossible challenge.

HOMES FOR AGING REPORT

Mrs. Charles McKinney gave the report on Homes for Aging in the absence of Mrs. T. C. Crow. L. T. Hamrick, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Homes For Aging spoke to the report which was adopted as follows:

The ninth year of operation of the Baptist Homes for Aging began March 16, 1959. All three of the Homes--Resthaven, Albemarle, and Headquarters--have had a good year, and have been filled practically all the year to capacity, 119 counting residents and helpers. When vacancies occur, there are always more applications on the waiting list than rooms to be filled.

While the campaign to raise funds to build the fourth home in Eastern Carolina, at Hamilton, has not been completed yet there is good reason to believe that the money will be secured this year and construction will begin. Mr. Don G. Matthews of Hamilton has given the land for the site, and most of the \$50,000 which he promised. He is ready to give the balance when the extra \$100,000 has been raised.

Architectural plans and specifications for the enlargement of the infirmary at Headquarters have been prepared, and construction of 20 additional bedrooms should begin by September or October.

The two most pressing needs of the Homes for Aging now are (1) to finish raising the funds to start construction of the Hamilton Homes, and (2) to raise about \$75,000 to cover the balance needed to pay for the additional facilities in the infirmary expansion. So, a total amount of \$150,000 must be raised, therefore, to finish these two projects. When they are completed, 60 more bedrooms will be added, thus increasing the total capacity of all the Homes to 170 residents.

The total amount given by the Sandy Run Association to the Homes for Aging through June 30 was \$902.39.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

Rev. Guy Johnson gave the report on the Brotherhood which was adopted as follows:

The active participation by men in the program of the church is one of the most encouraging signs of our day. There are more men engaged in working, giving, and going for World Missions than at any time in the history of the church. This is true, largely, because of the challenge which has been presented to them through Brotherhood and Royal Ambassador programs. Special seasons of prayer and offerings for missions have become church-wide rather than a program for a single organization. The laymen of our churches are sharing in the pastors' keen interest for the salvation of the lost people in their own communities. The number of men who are willing and who possess the skill of witnessing to lost men is increasing every day. More men are capable of teaching and leading in the organizations of the church. Yet there are many men who are not enlisted. About 75 per cent of the men of our church rolls are still inactive. They are the Brotherhood's greatest challenge.

The purpose of the Brotherhood is to discover men and their talents and to enlist them in every phase of the program of the church and denomination. The Brotherhood seeks to accomplish this purpose by offering programs and activities in an atmosphere of fellowship, study, and action. Programs and activities are planned in four major areas: Evangelism, Stewardship, Cooperative Program or World Missions, and Royal Ambassadors.

Printed materials are available from two sources: Free materials may be ordered from the Brotherhood Department, Baptist Building, 301 Hillsboro Street, Raleigh, North Carolina; priced materials are purchased from the Brotherhood Commission, 1548 Poplar Avenue, Memphis, Tennessee. It is suggested that every church provide for the following priced materials in their budget:

"The Brotherhood Journal" (for each Brotherhood member)

"The Ambassador Life" (for each Royal Ambassador)

"The Ambassador Leader" (for each Royal Ambassador counselor)

The Brotherhood Department is planning a program of intensive training during 1960. Regional clinics will be provided for associational leadership and associational clinics will be conducted for church leaders in Brotherhood and Royal Ambassadors. ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT

The report on Associational Missions was presented by Rev. W. V. Carroll and was adopted as follows:

The first part of this calendar year the associational missionary and his family moved into the Associational Parsonage on 600 East Main St., Forest City, which the Association purchased last associational year.

A fine Associational R. A. Camp was held at Gardner-Webb College on July 20-24. One hundred and sixty-eight boys and counselors were enrolled. Eight boys gave their hearts to Christ; six felt called to be missionaries.

According to the associational treasurer's report four churches failed to send in any money to him for anything during the year.

The 685 baptisms this year is the greatest number we have had for many years. It may be our best record.

Twenty-eight churches observed January Bible Study Week. Perhaps this is our best record.

We are proud that there are 49 Training Unions in the Association.

There were 60 Vacation Bible Schools reported. This is our best record.

Another matter of real helpful progress is the employment of a part time secretary by our Association.

How wonderful to note that our Cooperative Program offering for the year was \$82,180.00, just a little over \$5,000.00 better than last year, and, so far as we know, the best year in our history.

The associational missionary's report of activities is as follows; visited in 134 services; delivered 43 sermons and addresses; taught 29 Sunday School classes; held 237 conferences; attended 56 associational meetings; also, attended 19 meetings outside our Association, including the Special Session of our Baptist State Convention and the regular Session, the Southern Baptist Convention, a week at Caswell, a week helping in a Sunday School Study Course in the Kings Mountain Association, published eight issues of bulletins and mailed 5,464 copies, mailed 4,942 letters and cards; and traveled 9,641 miles.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The Woman's Missionary Union report was presented by Mrs. J. E. Cargill followed by brief talks by Mrs. Earl Baldwin, Y. W. A. Director, and Mrs. Howard L. Radford, G. A. Director, on the work of the youth organizations. The report was adopted as follows:

Woman's Missionary Union of Sandy Run Association has gone forward in a commendable manner under the leadership and direction of Mrs. Woodrow Daves. This we attribute to her dedication and surrender to God's Will.

No statistics ever give a true report of work accomplished. There are always the intangibles that cannot be enumerated. However, through figures we can check and see if we are making progress. It is most gratifying to report 170 organizations, an increase of 17. Our gifts for special offerings show a large increase. For Foreign Missions we gave through the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering \$12,156.72, an increase of \$4,085.61. The Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions was \$3,102.00, an increase of \$1,126.17. Totals for the State Mission Offering are incomplete. We gained 88 tithers over last year's number. Mission Study books taught number 225, that is 72 more than last year. The fact that our publication subscriptions are 78 more than last year shows an eagerness and interest to learn more about the work.

Our spiritual life shows development, because 22 more organizations observed our Seasons of Prayer. As we have witnessed for Christ through Community Missions, 11 more organizations have joined us. How we praise God, that He has blessed us with these advances in our work. Had we a 'thousand tongues to sing, always it would be for the triumphs of His grace.'

This year we enter our second year of Jubilee Advance. The emphasis will be "Leadership Training." We pray that our leaders will avail themselves of every opportunity for study and training. During this ensuing year we want to all by very conscious of our watchword, "Not by might, nor by power, but of my Spirit, saith the Lord God of Hosts," Zachariah 4:6.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Rev. Dean Simpson presented the report on Baptist Children's Homes which was spoken to by Vernon Sparrow, Superintendent of Mills Home. The report was adopted as follows:

One has only to read the daily papers, and view with horror, the growing tide of juvenile delinquency in our nation, to gain a deeper appreciation of the beneficent results of our Children's Homes. Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, head of the F. B. I. says, "Our worse criminals today are coming from the teen age bracket, and steadily they are getting more and more vicious."

Each applicant is thoroughly screened and investigated with the utmost care by dedicated workers. Last year the growing number that had to be turned down exceeded that of any previous year. Very emphatically this reveals to us that we need to be more and more conscious of this rapidly expanding need.

Under the capable leadership of Dr. W. R. Wagoner, who has just completed his first year of service as head of Children's Homes, N. C. Baptists have experienced fruitful year of service in this area. Mr. Vernon Sparrow is the new superintendent at the Mills Home, having assumed his duties in July of this year.

There is still great need for more attention and development of the Foster Homes Program. Applicants still exceed the requests for such. N. C. Baptists last year served over 800 children and dealt with over 200 others.

The Children's Homes have two main sources of revenue. One being from the Cooperative Program and the other being the Thanksgiving Offering. Let us remember others needs this Thanksgiving and make more positive the thanks we feel for the gracious way in which God has supplied our own needs.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The Relief and Annuity Board Report was presented by Rev. Harold Wilson. Rev. W. G. Camp, retired minister receiving Relief and Annuity, spoke. The report was adopted as follows:

More than 5,300 retired or disabled ministers, denominational workers, and widows are receiving benefits from the Annuity Board. Approximately 1,300 of these are on the relief rolls and receive a share of the \$325,000 from the Cooperative Program designated for this work. The others receive a monthly check provided through their participation in one of the Board's protection plans.

Certificates were issued to 3,113 new members in all the Board's protection plans in 1958. This is a 27% increase over the previous year. Even with the increases in new members, there are still more than 60% of our Southern Baptist pastors not covered by the Annuity Board's protection program.

Until this percentage is greatly reduced or eliminated completely, the Board is not fulfilling its purpose of providing security and protection for every Southern Baptist minister and church. Each church is being asked to enroll its pastor in the protection plan, paying two-thirds of the cost of the plan. The state convention has agreed to pay the other one-third for every pastor in its state.

Certificate holders in the North Carolina Ministers Retirement Plan now number 536. Certificate holders in the Southern Baptist Protection Plan 575. This gives us a total of 1,111 pastors and denominational workers now enrolled. We have a total of 208 annuitants now receiving benefit from the plans. In addition to the annuitants 126 aged ministers or their widows are receiving direct relief grants amounting to \$17,932 annually.

TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS REPORT

Rev. M. H. Ingle presented the report on Temperance and Public Morals, which was spoken to by H. L. Ferguson. It was adopted as follows:

The alarm bell continues to ring, crime is still on the rampage, broken homes dot the highways of life, and the crimes we use to call hideous and alarming, the ones we use to read about in the large Metropolitan areas of our land, are happening in our own back yards, yea even in the front yards.

The medium of advertising is still all for the popular drink. We hear it on our radios, read about it on our billboards, and view them on our T. V., the same kind of advertising the Devil used in the Garden when Eve looked upon the forbidden fruit and saw it was pleasing to the eye.

The main concern, or what should be our main concern, is the on rush of crime among the teenagers of our time. I wish I had room to include everything J. Edgar Hoover had to say only last week about this phase of crime, in our country. He called this crime among our youth a Monster of Frightening Proportion. I quote, "The general public, long indifferent, to the problem of juvenile crime, now stands appalled at the spectacle of ram-paging teen-age criminals."

Blazing headlines of torture, sadism, murder, and gang warfare toll the depredations of teen-age menaces. The black figures of crime statistics present an even more doleful account. In 1958, arrests of juveniles under the age of 18 increased 8 per cent, while arrests of adults rose 1.8 per cent. Alarming, not only the frequency of youth crimes but the savagery of these offenses is mounting day by day, year by year. The problem of youthful crime. . . exists not only in the densely populated metropolitan centers, but in each and every community in the land. Violent crime sprees and the bizarre escapades of young hoodlums, wily and hardened beyond their years, fire the imagination of other young punks across the nation.

"Unfortunately, any escape from justice by youthful lawbreakers - through weak court systems, public indifference, soft-headed sentimentality, senseless preference for the rights of the criminal instead of for his victim - can only give encouragement to other young thugs. Action against this youth menace must not be delayed." Unquote.

This coming from a man who has spent a lifetime in the enforcement of law and order certainly ought to give us something to think about and act upon.

Our very own Sheriff in our county has warned repeatedly of the going-ons of many of our teenagers, but seemly instead of offering a helping hand we offered a front page of ridicule.

I don't think we can go to a better place than to the Bible for words to close this report. "How long wilt thou sleep oh Sluggard, when will thou arise out of thy sleep." Proverbs 6-9.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

The report on Home Missions was presented by Mrs. Frank Willis and was adopted as follows:

Dr. Courts Redford, Executive Secretary-Treasurer, reports that on May 1, 1959, the number of mission personnel reached the all-time high of 1,386. In addition, about 450 student summer missionaries worked for ten weeks under the direction of home missionaries, and 382 Southern Baptist Chaplains were on active duty. During 1958 your home missionaries saw 41,859 professions of faith. Home missionaries led in constituting 399 new churches.

A most significant advance was the reorganization of the Board. Five divisions were formed to unify, strengthen, and correlate all the work. They are; Missions Division, Evangelism Division, Education and Promotion Division, Church Loans Division and Chaplains Division.

The Home Mission Board is increasing its co-operation with the State Boards.

Cuba and Panama continue to make progress toward self-support.

The Church Loan Fund has been increased to push forward the 30,000 Movement. Pastoral Aid, extended by the Board, is a key factor in the establishment of new missions and churches.

The Home Mission Board has made unusual progress toward achieving its Jubilee Advance goals. Nineteen and fifty-eight was a year of prayer, and millions of Southern Baptists signed soul-winning cards. Over 29,000 churches participated in the Simultaneous Crusades in 1959. Extensive plans are being made to expand the program of conserving the results of Evangelism.

Evangelism--Personal Witnessing--was the theme of the 1959 Home Mission graded series. The books had a circulation of over 335,000. The number of churches conducting Schools of Missions increased to 2,500.

Two filmstrips were produced on Evangelism; one on the 30,000 Movement; one Teamed for Missions, on Associational Missions. Four sermons and the sign language were filmed for the deaf.

Southern Baptist growth is Home Missions progress. Southern Baptists in this year have their greatest opportunity in the influence of their churches through the Home Mission Board to claim our land for Christ.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Rev. Olen L. Kendrick presented the report on Foreign Missions, which was adopted as follows:

This has been a year of abounding blessings from God. Throughout the Convention, prayer was stressed and visible results have been seen in answer to these prayers. During the year, 137 missionaries were appointed. With pride and thanksgivings, we are able to report that of that number, two are from our association. Rev. and Mrs. Zeb Moss have been appointed to work in Africa. This makes a total of four from this association, who are serving the "Foreign Mission Board." Miss Bertie Lee Kendrick and Miss Marjorie Bridges are working on Maui Island In Hawaii.

Southern Baptist demonstrated throughout 1958 a determination to provide the financial support for mission expansion through the increased Cooperative Gifts and Lottie Moon Christmas Offerings. According to our Executive Secretary, Dr. Baker J. Cauthen, this has been the greatest year in the history of Southern Baptist in financial support.

We believe it will be possible by the end of 1964 to have under appointment no less than 2,000 missionaries, and there is a place awaiting each one of them.

Plans call for expansion in Africa and in our Far East, as well as extensions of the outreach of missionaries in countries we are serving throughout Latin America.

The need today is greater than ever before in our history due to the increase in World population, which is outstripping our total Christian efforts. Percentage wise, the world is more non-Christian each year, even though the Christian Witness is more extensive than ever before. Christ gave his challenge to a handfull of men, when he left the first Foreign Mission Program.

May God grant, that we never lost faith in his promise, to be with us to the end of our task.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The report on the American Bible Society was given by Allen Painter and was adopted as follows:

For more than 142 years, since its organization in 1816, the American Bible Society, a non-profit organization, supported by the gifts of some 50 Protestant denominations and hundreds of thousands of individual gifts, has been busily engaged in the production and distribution of the Holy Scriptures throughout the world. The Society serves the missionaries of all home and foreign boards, whether denominational, interdenominational or independent. Its single mission is "To encourage the wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment."

To encourage wider use, Bibles are usually sold at well below cost, and when necessary, are furnished without charge. For instance, in India, every copy of the Holy Scriptures is published by the Bible Societies. There is no other source of supply. Since they must be sold at a loss to place them within reach of the masses, no other publisher could compete in price. Copies of the Gospel portions are offered for one anna, about 1 1/3 cent.

The operations of the Society are perhaps of more of a global nature than those of any other Christian agency. Its witness is heard in more than a hundred lands and in over a thousand tongues. Through its efforts, the Gospel is being carried literally to the ends of the earth, in accordance with the Lord's command.

In 1950, it was estimated that about 44% of the total world population fifteen years and over were illiterate. To minister to the needs of some of these illiterates, the Society has recently introduced a feather-weight plastic phonograph, called the Finger-Fono, which can be operated by one finger, and which has been hailed throughout the Christian world as a great new idea for advancing Bible teaching. The Society has undertaken this project, in addition to its regular work of translating, publishing, and distributing the Scriptures, because this is a vital service to mankind to hasten the day when "the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea."

Every church in the Sandy Run Association should have a part in this all important work of the American Bible Society. The best way is to include an amount in the church budget. If this is not done, the people should be given an opportunity at some time during the year to make a special contribution to the Society.

MUSIC MINISTRY REPORT

John B. Blanton gave the report on the Music Ministry in the absence of Edwin Chenoweth. The report was adopted as follows:

We are glad to see the growing interest and emphasis on church music. All over North Carolina much interest is being manifested in the improvement of this part of our program. "Churches everywhere are seeing that their music involves a great deal more than a choir and a special number before the sermon each Sunday morning. They are coming to realize that the various age groups need to participate through the Graded Choir Program. The entire congregation needs music education and a chance to participate. Congregational activities constitute the most important phase of the music ministry of any church. The instrumentalists, mainly organists and pianists, need opportunities for improvement. This constitutes an almost undiscovered field of endeavor. Baptists throughout the State are responding to the idea that we must have good music in every phase of our church program. They are seeing its value for worship and for the Christian education of the people."

We are encouraged with the interest and progress in this phase of our associational work.

The following associational musical activities took place in our Association during the year: a good Christmas Carol Sing was held in the streets of Forest City last December; a School of Music was held the last week of January; there were three Hymn Sings; six churches participated in the Regional Hymn Festivals with all coming out eligible for the State Festival and one church participated in the State Festival.

Our music organization is fully organized. The officers are helping various churches with their music program. Also, they are extending their services to the Regional and State musical program.

EVANGELISM REPORT

In the absence of Rev. J. R. Featherston, the Evangelism Report was given by Rev. Guy Johnson. Dr. Julian S. Hopkins, State Secretary of Evangelism, spoke to the report which was adopted along with the resolutions at the conclusion of the report.

Jesus' command to us is, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Matthew 28:19-20. Here Jesus summed up God's purpose in the world and the objective toward which God's people must ever move in full dedication if they are to be in His will.

The purpose of God in which He uses His people (and the only purpose in which He uses them) is the evangelization of the world. Evangelization means "making disciples," "baptizing them," and "teaching them" to be obedient to Christ in "all things" He has commanded. Thus a person is not evangelized until he becomes an evangelist. Therefore, evangelism is to make disciples and mature them. This is God's purpose and plan for His people in the world.

In the Great Commission, Jesus said, "Go," "teach" with the purpose of making disciples, "baptize" and "teach" them to be obedient to Christ in all things. The only imperative in all these mighty words of action is "to make disciples" or to teach with the purpose of making disciples. Thus Jesus puts soul-winning first in His total program with a definite command. In every church or associational program, soul-winning must be in the forefront of its total program to be in the will of Christ. This order is the divine imperative. Any individual or church that changes this order is disobedient to Christ, and therefore cannot expect His empowering and blessing upon the efforts put forth.

In the Sandy Run Association reports on the 1959 Crusade reveal the following: Thirty-nine churches and one mission reported 231 baptisms, 53 by letter and a total of 284 additions. Additions to the churches for the year in the association were: baptisms 685; other additions 563; total additions 1,248. This is an increase over 1958 of 141 in baptisms and 196 in total additions.

The ratio of baptisms to church members is 1:22 for Southern Baptists and 1:25 for North Carolina Baptist. Our Association's ratio for 1957 was 1:32; it was 1:35 in 1958, and this year it is 1:29. The goal of Southern Baptists in ratio of baptisms to church members is 1:8. This constitutes our greatest challenge. Only as we get soul-winning in the forefront of our total program can we become obedient servants of Christ. In an effort to achieve this objective, therefore, be it resolved that the Sandy Run Association adopt the following goals:

1. To conduct an annual clinic devoting two sessions exclusively to evangelism striving to have at least seventy-five per cent of the churches and pastors participating.

2. To conduct an annual Simultaneous Revival Crusade with at least eighty per cent of the churches participating.

3. To endeavor to have at least seventy-five per cent of the churches using the church council and sustaining perennial programs of evangelism with soul-winning in the forefront of the total program in every church.

THE CONSTITUTION

SANDY RUN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article I — Name

This body shall be known as the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

Article II — Membership

Sec. 1. The Association shall be composed of Baptist Churches of Rutherford County, Cleveland County and Polk County which are now members, and any other Baptist churches which may hereafter be admitted as provided.

Sec. 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented by her pastor and two representatives. Any church with more than fifty members shall be entitled to a messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. New churches may be admitted by a majority vote of messengers present after careful examination and found to be regular in their organization, orthodox in their doctrine, and supporting objects of the Association, State, and Southern Baptist Conventions. Churches are to be accepted under watchcare of the Association for a period of one year in order that the above may be determined.

Sec. 4. The Association may at any time dissolve connection with any church that becomes heterodox in doctrine or disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Sec. 5. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure.

Sec. 6. In case of internal dissention in a church and two parties coming up to the Association, each claiming to represent the church; neither party shall be seated as messengers until the question is decided as to which party is the church in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of messengers present.

Article III — Objects

The objects of the Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence, and spiritual power of the churches and to direct, promote, and develop their energies in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially

along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the State Baptist Convention, and the Association itself.

Article IV - Meetings

Sec. 1 The Association shall meet in annual session on Tuesday and Wednesday after the Second Sunday in October of each year. The Moderator shall call the body to meet in extra session if necessity shall arise.

Sec. 2 The Associational year shall begin October 1 of each year and close September 30 of the following year.

Article V - Officers and Duties

Sec. 1. The officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, and leaders of the organized work in the Association, who shall be chosen annually by a majority present.

Sec. 2. The officers shall perform all duties usually devolving upon such offices in well deliberative assemblies.

Sec. 3. The term of Moderator shall not exceed more than two consecutive years.

Sec. 4. The Missionary of the Sandy Run Baptist Association shall work with and assist the churches and missions of the Association in the promotion of their work and shall be under the supervision of the Associational Board.

Article VI - Associational Board

Sec. 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of the officers of the Association (Article V, Sec. 1) who shall also be the officers of this Board with the Moderator as chairman, the leader of each of the Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music,) the Associational Missionary (ex-officio), the Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative on the Baptist State Convention General Board, each active pastor, and two members selected by each active church of the Association.

Sec. 2. This body shall act for the Association in the interim between annual sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, neither taking any action contrary to the will of the Association, nor initiating any new policy or practice binding upon the Association unless specifically so directed. However, in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action so taken shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for its consideration.

Sec. 3. The Board shall be divided into committees with assigned duties (Article VII, Sec. 1.)

Sec. 4. The Clerk will make a report to the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 5. This body shall meet on Monday following the first Sunday in each quarter. The place may be decided.

Article VII - Committees and Their Duties

Sec. 1. ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD COMMITTEES. The Associational Board shall be divided by the Committee on Committees into the following committees with their duties.

I. ADVISORY STEERING COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Associational Missionary, the leader of each Associational Organization (Pastors' Conference, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music), Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative of the Baptist State Convention General Board, the Chairman of the Associational Board Committee 2-7, and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

- (1) To study and act upon any matters of business of the Associational Board between quarterly meetings of the Board. Any action taken shall be dependent upon the approval of the Associational Board.
- (2) To counsel and advise any committee or church in the Association on any suggestion that may be submitted to it.
- (3) To counsel, advise, and direct the Associational Missionary and recommend to the Associational Board any necessary changes in any phase of the work.
- (4) To assist the Associational Missionary in his work and, in event of his resignation, this Committee shall be responsible for finding and recommending a successor to the Associational Board.
- (5) To work with the Associational Missionary in formulating a calendar of activities for the Association.

2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. This Committee and its chairman, consisting of nine members, shall be appointed by the Moderator of the Association soon following the annual session of the Association. It shall, as soon as possible, meet and assign the members of the Associational Board to the various committees, naming the chairman of each except as otherwise provided, and name the Standing Committees and their chairman (Article VII, Sec. 2.) Also, it shall name any other committee assigned to it.

3. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM. This Committee shall be composed of the Associational Chairman of Evangelism and members assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings and organizations of the Association. It shall also encourage and help arrange revivals in every section of the Association and lead in simultaneous revivals. The chairmen will submit a written report to the annual session of the Association.

4. COMMITTEE ON ORDINATIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall serve in an advisory capacity when called upon to assist in the examination and ordination of deacons and candidates for the gospel ministry.

5. COMMITTEE ON LOCATION OF NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. Its duties shall be as follows:

- (1) Receive and consider any request by any group for a mission to be organized into a Baptist church and recommend action to the Associational Board.
- (2) Be alert to develop any lead that might be given toward the establishment of a new church or mission. Advise with the group, or groups, involved what steps should be taken in the location and organization of a mission or church.
- (3) Consider applications from any church or churches desiring membership in the Sandy Run Association and make recommendations to the Associational Board as to what action should be taken.

6. **COMMITTEE ON FINANCES, BUDGET, AND AUDITING.** This Committee shall be composed of the Treasurer as chairman, Moderator, S. S. Supt., T. U. Director, W. M. U. President, Brotherhood President, Church Music Director, and as many other members as the Committee on Committees may deem wise. This Committee shall prepare and recommend a budget for the Associational Program and suggest ways and means to the churches whereby the budget can be raised. It shall also be responsible for auditing the Treasurer's book.

7. **COMMITTEE ON FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE.** The Committee on Committees shall appoint this Committee, naming the chairman, and assign as many members as it deems wise. It shall consider all church or mission requests for pastoral aid and requests to be made to the State or Home Mission Boards for aid or loans in buying church lots and shall make recommendations concerning them to the Associational Board.

8. **COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.** This Committee and its chairman shall be named by the Committee on Committees. It shall bring a suitable report at the annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches to have died since the last annual session.

9. **COMMITTEES TO REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL WORK.** These are Committees on (1) State Missions, (2) Home Missions, (3) Foreign Missions, (4) Christian Literature, (5) Christian Education, (6) Children's Homes, (7) Homes for the Aging, (8) Baptist Hospital, (9) Relief and Annuity, (10) Temperance and Civic Righteousness, (11) Stewardship and (12) American Bible Society. These Committees and their chairmen, composed of not less than five members, shall be named by the Committee on Committees. Their duties shall be to inform our people about the work they are chosen to represent and lead in promoting it. The chairman of each Committee shall make a brief written report at the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 2. STANDING COMMITTEES. These Committees and their chairmen shall also be appointed by the Committee on Committees at the time the Associational Board Committees are appointed, but they are not necessarily composed of Board members. They shall serve through the annual session of the Association. These Committees are:

1. **TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of five members and shall report at the annual session. It shall state the time of the next annual meeting of the Association (Article IV, Sec. 1) recommend the place or places of the meeting, and recommend the preacher and the alternate.

2. **PROGRAM COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Associational Music Director, Associational Missionary, and host pastor or pastors. It shall prepare a printed program for the annual meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall in the opening of the annual meeting of the Association present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

3. **RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE.** This committee shall be composed of five members. It shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it may deem expedient. Also, resolutions and recommendations presented at the annual session may be referred to this Committee.

4. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE:** This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall contact and nominate to the Associational Board in its last meeting before the annual session of the Association for election, all the leaders of Associational Organizations (S. S., T. U., W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music) so these leaders in turn can present their helpers to the

Association in annual session for election. The Committee shall also contact and nominate at the annual session of the Association all Associational Officers, (Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian) and the Chairman of Evangelism.

Article VIII - Trustees

Sec. 1. There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer.

Sec. 2. The Trustees and their chairman shall be appointed annually by the Committee on Committees at the time this Committee appoints the Associational Board Committees.

Sec. 3. Their duties shall be to hold title to property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association with the Association or Associational Board's fore-knowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution of the Association, and with State laws as they effect the Association.

Article IX

This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers in attendance, provided that notice is given and the proposed amendment is stated during the first day, but no vote shall be taken upon the proposed amendment until the afternoon session of the second day.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with song and prayer.

2. The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association. He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise provided for.

3. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be considered an authority in all cases not provided for in the Rules of Order: "but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the Presiding Officer may use his discretion subject to an appeal to the Association."

4. Brethren invited to sit with us shall have the liberty of discussion, but not of voting.

5. Speakers shall rise and address the Moderator, and shall confine themselves to the subject under discussion. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the Association.

6. No question shall be discussed without a motion thereon first being made and seconded. Motions made and seconded shall be stated by the Moderator previous to any discussion thereon. If motion contains two or more parts, it shall be divided at the request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote of the body.

New pastors were recognized as follows: Rev. L. R. McNeil, Bethany; Rev. Charles McDaniel, Sandy Level Church; and Dr. A. B. Wood, Interim Pastor of Florence Church. Malone Thomason, Minister of Music of Spencer Church was also recognized.

There were visitors from adjoining Associations, Kings Mountain and Green River and from the First Baptist Church of Union, South Carolina.

ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD REPORT

The report of the Associational Board of the Sandy Run Association was presented by Miss Martha Jean McFarland, Clerk, and was adopted as follows:

The following report gives the important transactions of the Associational Board for the year.

On October 26, the Board heard the reports of the different organizations. The Committee on Committees, having divided the members into various committees, presented this report, which was adopted with several changes being made. It was also suggested that each church increase its contribution to the Association by 10 per cent, there being an increase in the budget for the year.

View Church remain under the watchcare of the association for one year, at which time, it would become a member of the association.

A motion was also carried that Goode's Grove Church, having requested membership with the association, remain under the watch of the association until the annual session, at which time, further action would be taken. It was stated for information that the group from Calvary would remain under the supervision of the committee until such time as they shall find a church to sponsor them.

A motion was carried that a letter be sent to all the churches concerning the indebtedness of the association.

On July 7, a motion was passed that the Jubilee Revival in our association be held March 19 - April 2, 1961.

It was brought to the attention of the board that we would need approximately \$400.00 to care for the expense of the Sunday School Teaching Clinic in October. A motion was passed that Dwight Watts, Sunday School Superintendent, work out a suggested plan for distributing this amount among the churches and notify them of the same.

A recommendation was made that four men be appointed to attend the Regional Brotherhood meeting in Shelby and obtain information on R. A. work. As only two names, Carlisye Henderson and J. D. Holland, were submitted, a motion was passed that Joe Bridges, Brotherhood president, select two other members to serve on this committee.

On September 26, the board held its quarterly meeting and the records of the various organizations were heard.

Mr. Price presented the treasurer's report stating that 16 churches had not contributed to the associational program this year.

The Regional Bible Teaching Clinic of October 3-6 at Florence Church was announced and attendance stressed.

MOUNTAIN VIEW BAPTIST MISSION

On Sunday afternoon, January 17, 1960, the committee met with the Mountain View Baptist Mission which had requested admittance into the Sandy Run Association. After examination of the building, the location, the physical facilities, the organization, the constitution and the By-Laws, the committee found the mission on good order and without any indebtedness. In the organization of the council, Rev. M. D. Blanton was elected as Moderator, and Rev. W. V. Carroll as secretary. The moderator explained the Articles of Faith and the secretary explained the By-Laws. These speakers made suggestions and recommendations, which the mission voted to accept, in preparation for organization into a Baptist Church which would be recommended to the Association for admittance on probation for at least one year.

After the singing of a hymn, "Bless Be the Tie", Rev. Harold Brown brought the organizational sermon, using as a basis for his message Matthew 28: 19-20, Matthew 16: 18 and Acts 1:8. The subject of his message was "Our Heritage and Challenge." This was an excellent sermon.

Following the sermon the following church officers were elected:

Deacons: G. P. Watkins and E. N. Lovelace

Clerk: To be elected later

Treasurer: Carl Street

Sunday School Superintendent: E. N. Lovelace

Training Union Director: Mrs. G. P. Watkins

There being no further business Rev. M. D. Blanton closed the council with prayer.

By request the committee was called to meet at the Florence Church, February 11, 1960, to confer with a representative group from the Community Mission located near T. C. Holland's Store not far from Henrietta, N. C. Four members of the committee responded. After a lengthy discussion, and seeing no hope for a reconciliation, the committee reluctantly agreed for the group to proceed as a mission provided it would comply with suggestions from the committee.

Later some opposition developed concerning this action of the committee, and a second meeting of the committee was called at Florence Church. Pastors from the near by Baptist churches were invited to attend this meeting together with brother S. L. Lamm who was supplying at Calvary Church at the time. After much discussion the representatives together with its pastor agreed to continue as a mission until such a time, when and if, a church could be found that would sponsor the mission. They agreed to be guided by the suggestions of the sponsoring church. The mission showed a desire to cooperate with the Association and to be an active part of it. Due to the persistence of the group the committee concluded that the wisest procedure would be to cooperate with the mission and seek to keep it within the Association.

Just recently the pastor reported to the chairman of the committee that they had tried several churches, but that they had not found one that would sponsor them. Hence, they kept their part of the agreement, and under the circumstances the committee, in a meeting at the Alexander Baptist Church, September 27, 1960, with five members present, decided by mutual consent, to recommend that this group be received under the watchcare of the Association for a period of at least one year. During this period the committee and the Association give any help and guidance that it can give to the mission.

Further, since the group is organized and functioning in its support of the Associational program and State Convention; and, since it can find no church that will sponsor it, that it be given the approval of the Association to organize into a Missionary Baptist Church so that it can proceed with the erection of a church building which it plans to do.

REPORT ON THE NEW BETHEL CHURCH

In response to a request by the pastor of the New Bethel Baptist Church, Harris, N. C., the committee met with a representative group from this church at Alexander Baptist Church, Forest City, N. C., September 27, 1960, and considered its request for admission into the Sandy Run Association. After much discussion and questioning the group agreed to accept the committee's suggestions to help set up a budget for the church and to comply with whatever suggestions might be made in order that it might become a part of the Association. The spirit of the group was very commendable.

Since the church is established; is functioning, and has been for about three years; and, that it agrees to support fully the Baptist Program, the committee makes the following recommendation: that this church be received under the watchcare of the Association for a period of at least one year during which time the committee will give what help it can in the way of guidance and counsel so that it may become one of our duly constituted Baptist Churches.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

The report of the Stewardship Committee was presented by Rev. J. W. Harris and was adopted as follows:

In Paul's first Letter to the Corinthians, Chapter four, verse two, he says; "Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful."

We know from a study of God's word that all men are "stewards of the Living God." For several years Southern Baptist have earnestly been trying to instill this truth in the hearts of our people. Through every agency possible, in our state, our Association and even in our churches, we are emphasizing the importance of being a good steward.

As stewards of the Living God, we are selected and commissioned to carry on the work of God upon this earth. As trustees of this great Kingdom, we must give an account of our faithfulness. We must ever keep in mind that stewardship involves more than money - it includes the whole of man, his personality, his powers, and his possessions. Not until one surrenders his whole life, his total abilities, and his material substance to be used as God directs, will he be practicing Stewardship as the Bible records it.

In order that we may see something of the progress made in this important phase of our work let us compare a few facts revealed in a study of our Associational Minutes.

In 1950 the churches reported 1,729 tithers. In 1959, 2,428 were reported.

In 1950, a total of \$486,965.00 was paid out for all purposes. In 1959, a total of \$738,789.00 was paid out for all purposes. This shows an increase of \$251,824.00 in a period of less than ten years.

In 1950, the average pastor's salary, in this association, was \$1,888.00 and in 1959, the average had increased to more than \$3,000.00.

Dr. Porter Routh, Executive Secretary and Treasurer of our Convention, made this statement about Stewardship: "When God is the center of life, stewardship is a natural expression. Stewardship cannot be tacked to life. It is not like the spoke of a wheel; it is the hub, it is not like an arm or a finger; it is the heart. Through Christian stewards, God expresses Himself in His love flowing through every area of human need."

The unmistakable conclusion is that when the members of our churches accept and practice God's Plan of Stewardship and Tithing, His work will prosper. We cannot improve upon His plan.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE REPORT

Rev. M. C. Swicegood presented the report on Christian Literature, which was spoken to by Rev. Lloyd Garner, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Rutherfordton, in the absence of Marse Grant. The report was adopted as follows:

It is surprising to see the kind of literature that is stacked on our news stands, and further still to see our Christian people choosing that for reading purposes in lieu of the good Christian literature that is available.

Our Religious presses are not being operated for a profit, therefore we ought to use them to the limit. There are a number of religious journals that ought to be in every Baptist Home. Some of which include The Biblical Recorder, The Charity and Children, The Home Mission Magazine, The Home Life and a number of others. Two of these ought by all means be placed in the Church Budget to assure every family getting them - The Biblical Recorder and the Charity and Children certainly.

The past year has been very trying on the above mentioned periodicals. Both of them have been faced with the responsibility of securing editors. We are glad to report that both have succeeded. The Biblical Recorder can be purchased through the Church Budget for less than the price of a stamp per week. It is the one way of keeping our people informed. The more informed our people are the smoother will our work be.

Before we can be inspired to do anything, we must have some information concerning it. Our Christian Literature will keep us informed as well as inspired.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

The Baptist Hospital Report was presented by Rev. M. H. Ingle. In the absence of Dr. Richard K. Young, it was spoken to by Albert Meibury from the Department of Pastoral Care, Baptist Hospital, Winston-Salem. The report was adopted.

The Ministry of our Baptist Hospital touches every area of our state. Last year it served more than 17,000 bed patients, with 150,000 visits being made to clinics and offices. They came for examinations, medical treatment, skilled surgery, and spiritual guidance. Many of our homes, most of our churches, and almost all of our communities have been served by this ministry of healing. It touches the family life of about a quarter of a million of our people each year.

Sickness is no respecter of persons or pocket books. It strikes the rich and poor alike - the widow, the orphan, the aged. There are times when they need such specialized care as that available at our Baptist Hospital. The Mother's Day Fund provided money with which our Hospital gives assistance to those who cannot pay the full cost of their care. Our Hospital almost doubles our gifts with matching funds from welfare agencies and other gifts. In addition to this, the medical staff gives its services without charge to all service patients, except for available insurance payments.

Probably we should ask ourselves if we as Christians should provide such a ministry for our needy, sick neighbors. Jesus and the New Testament writers give us the answer. But do we really want such a ministry? It cannot be provided except as a great cost. Our Hospital receives about 3 3/4% of our Co-operative Program funds for payments on the building, purchase of expensive equipment, such as heart-lung machines, and for the Department of Pastoral Care. Our Mother's Day Fund provides the money to help pay the hospital bills of needy, sick persons. The amount of this fund determines for the most part the amount of help our Hospital can give.

Last year (1959) our churches of Sandy Run Association gave \$4,209.17 on Mother's day. This year (1960) we gave \$4,644.49, a slight increase, but nothing comparable to the increase in cost per patient. If we are serious about this ministry, so near to the heart of our Lord, then we are going to have to become serious about our giving to the Mother's Day Fund.

HISTORIAN REPORT

Rev. W. F. McGinnis presented the Historian's report which was adopted as follows:

The following are the reported activities of progress and history of the churches of the Association:

I. Construction.

Bostic Church built a new pastorium during the year.

Fairview added a front porch to their community building.

Prospect completed their educational building and dedicated it.

II. Improvements.

Adaville purchased robes for choir; held a wonderful Laymen Led Revival; and landscaped, beautified, and sowed cemetery. Bostic painted basement and outside of Church building. Caroleen organized a Drama Club for Young People, took census and made study of needs, purchased new dishes for kitchen, and gave Bibles and subscriptions to the "Baptist Student Magazine" to their high school and college graduates. Fairview painted

their community building. First Broad leveled and sowed grass in cemetery. High Shoals graded and sowed a portion of the lawn and installed a public address system. Holly Springs paid their debt on the second anniversary of their new building and dedicated it on September 18, 1960, with Rev. N. B. Phillips, former pastor, preaching the dedicatory sermon. The Church purchased a new piano and installed an electric organ too. Mt. Pleasant (C) brick veneered and remodeled their auditorium and bought new pews and pulpit furniture. They held a dedication service on July 24, 1960. Spencer purchased a new scout hut and property for a home for their minister of music. Race Path held a ground breaking service for their new education building of 13,000 square feet on September 4, 1960. Temple purchased new robes for their choir.

III. Pastoral Changes

Calvary called Phate W. McSwain, Jr., a student at Gardner-Webb, and ordained him. Chase Mission, which was organized this year, called Rev. Melvin Flynn. Concord called Rev. Harvey Laughter for pastor and also ordained Frank Woody to the gospel ministry at the request of the Mountain View Church. Bethany called Rev. L. R. McNeil. Fairview called Sidney Zemp who was ordained by the Florence Church. Sandy Level called Rev. Charles R. McDaniel. Spencer called Rev. A. B. Bumgarner.

IV. Ministers of Music and Education Changes.

Caroleen called Carlisle Henderson as Minister of Music, and Spencer called Malone Thomason. Spencer also voted to call a Minister of Education.

V. New Missions and Churches Organized.

The Chase Baptist Mission was organized on Sunday, February 21. The Mountain View Baptist Mission was organized into Mountain View Baptist Church on Sunday afternoon, April 24.

Brief histories of the Host Churches were prepared by the Historian as follows:

CLIFFSIDE

The Cliffside Church was organized on April 26, 1903 with 34 charter members. The first pastor was Rev. R. A. Hedgepath who was called on May 24, 1903.

The church first met in the homes of the community and later moved into the old town hall and then later into the old school house where they met for a short time.

On May 17, 1907 the church appointed a building committee which led the church in constructing a building on North Main Street which was dedicated August 15, 1909.

The church grew rapidly and had a total of 292 members by 1909. Mr. B. E. Roach led in the development of the teaching and training program and was the first minister of music and education. Mr. Edwin Chenoweth is the present minister of music and education.

One of the outstanding influential members of the church was Mr. Raleigh R. Haynes, founder of the town and builder of the Cliffside mill. He was a devoted servant of the church until his death, February 6, 1917.

The following pastors served the church in its first plant: R. A. Hedgepath, 1903-1905; B. M. Bridges, 1905-1907; N. R. Stone, 1908; C. W. Payseur, 1908-1911; F. B. Raymond, 1911-1912; A. L. Stoudenmire, 1912-1914; D. J. Hunt, 1914-1921.

In a dozen years the membership had grown beyond 400. The church having outgrown its first quarters, on May 24, 1922, a building committee was appointed composed of W. K. Collins, J. H. Hill, J. P. Carpenter and Charles H. Haynes. This committee led the church to adopt the plans of the

present building. The building debt was paid in May 1941 and dedication services were held on August 24, 1941.

The church membership now stands at 1,090. A new wing had been added to the present building that houses a church kitchen, dining room, graded nursery and young adult department. The old nursery was converted into a beautiful library which now contains 1,780 volumes.

The pastors serving the church in the present building are as follows: W. K. Collins, 1921-1923; Charles H. Stevens, 1923-1925; Roscoe C. Smith, 1926-1929; J. A. Hunnicutt, 1930-1938; M. V. Tarlton, 1938-1944; O. D. Moore, 1944-1945; Tom S. Lawrence, 1946-1958; John W. Lucas, 1959---

FLOYD'S CREEK

The Floyd's Creek Church was organized Saturday, September 3, 1870, with 52 charter members.

In 1952, realizing the need for a larger church building, Rev. W. C. Keller, pastor at that time, started a building fund and ground breaking service was held on May 6, 1956 with Rev. W. F. Woodall, Mrs. James Phillips, Rev. Fred Bryant, J. Boyd Horton and John Tate participating.

A building committee composed of John Tate, Edgar Pace and Oscar Harrill was appointed, and the building was erected at an approximate cost of \$80,000 for building and equipment. The new building was occupied on March 24, 1957 and dedication service and open house were held Sunday, April 7, 1957.

The present membership is 320 with a Sunday School enrolment of 219 and a Training Union enrolment of 95.

The following pastors have served the church: J. T. Moss, 1890-1892; J. T. Hoard, 1882-1894; W. G. P. Ezell, 1895-1899; T. C. Harris, 1900-1902; H. D. Harrill, 1903-1905; Z. D. Harrill, 1906-1913; T. C. Harris, 1914-1915; J. G. Garmon, 1915-1917; T. C. Harris, 1917-1919; J. H. Smith, 1920-1922; W. B. Jenkins, 1923-1927; A. G. Melton, 1928-1932; M. D. Blanton, 1932-1934; W. B. Jenkins, 1935-1938; J. L. McCluney, 1939-1941; E. P. White, 1941-1942; B. M. Strickland, 1943-1945; H. L. Finley, 1946-1950; W. C. Keller, 1951-1955; B. Fred Bryant, 1955---

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

This year has been another wonderful year for the teaching of God's word through our Sunday Schools. Only eternity will relate the blessings of this year's work. We have had several meetings this year, meetings planned

to help our Sunday Schools, and to help the personnel do a better job.

This has been a good year for Daily Vacation Bible School. There were 59 schools with an enrolment of 5,385.

Our people earned a number of awards for study this year, under our new study program. This part of our great program ought to be stressed more and more on the local level in order for those who teach and for those who lead to be better teachers and better leaders.

A personal word to those who hold places of leadership in our churches. There is a great need on the part of all to increase our cooperation toward our associational program. For the Glory of God, for the advancement of Christ Kingdom, let us work at this great task together.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

The year of 1960 has been a good year in Training Union work. The theme, "Training in Church Membership", was followed for the year. On April 9, 1960 at Caroleen Churchour Youth Night Service was held, with 22 churches comprising a total of 250 present of their young people. Following the theme, "Growing More Like the Master in Daily Living," the young people of our association gave the program. A panel discussion titled, "Youth Wants to Know," was held based on questions coming from the Young People. Panel moderator was Mr. Carroll Kirby. Panelists were Rev. D. Hoke Coon, Rev. James McAllister, Mr. Leonard Lowe, Mrs. J. E. Cargill, Miss Martha Burns. Mr. Spencer Allen, a student at Carson-Newman College, brought the inspirational message.

The Training Union Tournaments were held at Cliffside Church on April 18, 1960. We had a good representation in each department and a participant from each department who was eligible to participate in the Regional Tournaments at Belmont. We had eleven Juniors from our association enter the Regional Tournaments, and then go on to the State Tournament at Fruitland. Two of our boys, Jimmy Cooly from First Church, Forest City and Elcana Morrison from Adaville Church, were four-year winners.

On September 5, 1960 at Race Path Church the last meeting for the associational year was held. We had eighteen churches presented, with eleven Training Union directors and twelve pastors, making a total of 130 present. The Rev. Phate McSwain, pastor at Calvary Church, led the devotion. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

A program of intensified Christian education, wide in scope and deep in gentility is not foreign to North Carolina Baptists. Reaching far out into the needs of the people, North Carolina Baptists promote most faithfully the work in seven colleges: Wake Forest, Meredith, Mars Hill, Gardner-Webb, Wingate, Chowan and Campbell Colleges. In the year just passed some 8,100 students were permitted to reap the educational and cultural benefits from these institutions. Education does not come cheaply, as does anything else now, so it is not surprising to learn that it required some ten million dollars to finance these institutions, with one half million coming directly from the Cooperative Program, and another six hundred thousand held in readiness to meet the exploding demand of swelling registeries each year.

A startling fact is discovered when one considers of the 15,000 Baptist youth graduating last year, 10,000 of them did not go to college or

attend a Baptist College. Still more startling is the fact that of 8, 100 attending our Baptist colleges last year, only 5, 000 of them were Baptist!

The exploding population of today is placing strains yearly upon the whole educational facility. Along with everything else that is speeding on with accelerated programs in this modern world, we gasp with astonishment when we are informed by the statisticians that by 1970 there will be 35, 000 Baptist boys and girls in college! That phenomenal number in just ten years! Of course, the most searching question in the minds of the educators is HOW SHALL WE TRAIN THEM? If we continue to maintain the status quo, barely adequate now for the present, what will be the outcome, ten years from now, when Baptist boys and girls, hunger for education in a world where higher education is a necessity, begin the arduous search for institutions of learning which can accommodate them. We need to face soberly and most prayerfully every need and request of our educational institutions.

HOMES FOR AGING REPORT

The report on the Homes for Aging was given by J. I. McMahan and in the absence of William A. Poole, was spoken to by Charles Burchette, a representative of the Homes. The report was adopted as follows:

We were fortunate to have had James M. Hayes, Sr., as superintendent of the Homes for the Aging during the past nine years. We look forward to many blessings for the Homes in this the tenth year. The new superintendent, William A. Poole, is already diligently at work to build and expand our ministry to the aging in our midst.

The new Infirmary Annex with 28 new rooms, was ready for occupancy about September 1. The construction of the new proposed Hamilton Home,

with facilities for about 30 additional residents, will probably begin this fall. We are grateful to all who have contributed so liberally of their time and means to make possible this fourth Home for the Aging.

There is now a total of 106 residents in our three homes: Resthaven, 20; Albermarle, 34; Headquarters, 52. There are sixty on the waiting list, and new applications come in daily. Even with the new facilities that will be available in the near future, we doubtless, could fill rooms up to 500 in the next two years. Therefore, in planning for the future care of the aging in our state, we Baptists must attempt great things for God and expect things from God.

We are deeply grateful for the close relationship of pastors and churches with the Homes. We are wholly dependent upon the prayers and financial support of the churches. During the fiscal year, October 1, 1959 to August, 1960 we have received \$82,521.20 from the churches, \$76,352.70 of which was the Special Day Offering in February. This is \$123,000.00 short of our goal of \$200,000.00, but we are grateful to every one who has contributed to this worthy cause.

As in any home, we are sometimes glad, sometimes sad. The 99th birthday in July of Aunt Fannie Drumright was a happy occasion. We were saddened by the death of Miss Lillie Herring in October. Mrs. Mary Holder in April, Mrs. T. J. Castervens in June, and Mrs. Annie Smith in July.

Our fellow Baptist are welcome to visit the Homes at any time; and we would like to have it known throughout the State that nothing--but the lack of space-- stands in the way of any needy aging person coming to the North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging. Let us dedicate ourselves to the task of making more space available at the earliest possible date.

The Brotherhood report was given by Joe Bridges and was adopted as follows:

Organized Baptist Brotherhood work continue to receive the blessing of our Lord. Its purpose is to enlist, mobilize, and utilize the abilities of men in the promotion of their church and denominational program.

During the past year some interesting developments have transpired, not, however, to the extent we would like to see. We are encouraged by the indication that perhaps we are at the dawn of a new day for the men in our churches. Baptist laymen are assuming increasingly important roles of leadership and interest in the work of their churches. The beauty of this leadership is that it is practical and visionary insofar as our responsibility to the world is concerned.

One evidence of this is made manifest by increased interest in the Cooperative Program. Other fields of manifest interest have been boys work, evangelism, and Christian stewardship. Another encouraging development is the increased interest in the welfare of the minister, especially is this

noted in the increased number of men coming into the retirement and protection plans of our denomination.

CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Clyde High gave the report on the Baptist Children's Homes which was spoken to by W. R. Wagoner, Superintendent of Baptist Children's Homes. The following report was adopted;

Child care is a major responsibility in any society. This care should meet the highest standards as recognized by competent specialists in the field. Under the leadership of General Superintendent W. R. Wagoner and Superintendents W. A. Smith, Vernon S. Sparrow, and Rev. Chesley Hammond our denomination is moving forward in this area of service.

It is a multiple service agency providing Christian love and nurture for more than 800 deserving boys and girls annually. The three homes are: Mills Home at Thomasville with 311 children; Kennedy Home at Kinston with 165 children; and Odum Home at Pembroke with 24 children. There are 160 children in Foster Homes and 40 others who are assisted by Mother's Aid. Case work supervision is afforded 30 college students annually. Also, the Social Service Department of the Children's Homes affords case work services throughout the state.

Charity and Children, published weekly by the Baptist Children's Homes, is now making a great contribution to the total life of our Baptist people, under the leadership of editor John E. Roberts. Those of us who read Charity and Children regularly have learned to look eagerly for the next edition. It is filled with information every Baptist should know.

The financial support you gave last year was good, but did not meet all the needs. The deficit for the year ending September, 1960 will be at least \$10,000.00.

For the year 1960, the designated amount to be received from the Co-operative Program is \$281,000.00 which represents the largest single source of income and amounts to 31.5 per cent of the total income. During this year the gifts directly from the churches will amount to 21.9 per cent of the total income or approximately \$188,000.00. We are counting on the churches to continue to provide approximately 20% of our needed income through direct gifts during this period when the Co-operative Program is financially not able to meet the minimum needs of the Children's Homes.

The Thanksgiving Offering in 1959 amounted to \$273,472.42 and constituted 31.1 per cent of the income. In order to insure adequate financial support of our program of Child Care, we need a Thanksgiving offering in the amount of \$350,000.00 this Thanksgiving.

Truly we can say, "God is good to us, and through North Carolina Baptist He has lifted, and He will lift the burdens from the shoulders of many of our boys and girls."

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT

The report on Associational Missions was presented by Rev. W. V. Carroll and was adopted as follows:

A fine associational R. A. Camp was held at Gardner-Webb College on July 18-22. There were 158 boys and counsellors enrolled. Six boys gave their hearts to Christ; eleven felt called to be missionaries; eight felt called to be preachers; two felt called into some kind of special Christian service; and eleven boys went forward, rededicating their lives to Christ -- a total of 38 glorious decisions for Christ.

According to the associational treasurer's report, nine churches failed to send in any money to him for anything during the year.

The number of baptisms for the year was down, just 510, a ratio of 38 church members to one baptism.

There were 60 Vacation Bible Schools. Also, there were 51 Training Unions reported with a gain in enrollment and 49 Woman's Missionary Union organizations which was a gain of four.

Both local expenditures and gifts to missions increased \$143,394 over the year before. Gifts through the Cooperative Program were increased \$88,303 a gain of \$6,123 over the year before.

The associational missionary's report of activities is as follows: visited in 130 services; delivered 51 sermons and addresses; taught 27 Sunday School lessons; held 227 conferences; attended 54 associational meetings and helped in the associational R. A. Camp; also, attended 27 meetings outside the Associational including the State and Southern Baptist Conventions and a week at Caswell; published ten issues of bulletins and mailed 7,034 copies and mailed 5,640 letters and cards; helped prepare 500 booklets (21 pages each) of "Advanced Reports" for the Annual Session of the Association; worked up Calendar of Activities for 1960 and had 500 copies printed; and traveled 11,374 miles.

Our associational clerk-secretary, Miss Martha Jean McFarland, has done a wonderful work for us this year. She has mimeographed the bulletins for four of our churches each week during the year. Among the many other things she has done, she cut most of the stencils, mimeographed, and did most of the work in preparing the 690 booklets of "Advanced Reports."

The associational missionary would like to express his deep appreciation to the Associational Brotherhood for their great generosity in presenting the Association for his use a new Bell and Howell 16 mm. sound projector and a new screen.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The Woman's Missionary Union report was presented by Mrs. J. E. Cargill, Mrs. Carl Mauney, Sunbeam Director, Mrs. James Marchman, G. A. Director, and Mrs. Earl Baldwin, Y. W. A. Director, gave brief talks on the work of the youth organizations. The report was adopted as follows:

"Leadership Training" has been our emphasis in Woman's Missionary Union during this year. To advance we need trained, dedicated leaders. Last October our work began with a Leadership Conference. In January a Mission Study Institute was held. Three ladies attended the State Sunbeam Workshop in High Point in February and then in August we had an associational Sunbeam Workshop--seventy-five ladies attending this. During September a Leadership Training Course was held for W. M. S., Y. W. A. and G. A. and 139 attended these courses. We are happy that 103 completed this work and qualified for cards of Accrediation. Both local and individual study have been done also. Associational officers and local leaders have attended workshops at Waynesville and Hickory and quite a number were at Ridgecrest for W. M. U. week.

My promotion of W. M. U. work includes traveling 1,655 miles, sending 555 letters, assisting in teaching year book and study courses. I have visited and spoken in several organizations. No record of telephone calls, but probably into thousands. I have tried to go to all Associational, Regional

and State Meetings concerning W. M. U. How happy we are to announce ~~two~~ new W. M. S. organizations, Chase Baptist Mission and Mt. View Mission.

Our Y. W. A. work shows progress. Two members received Citations and thirteen are working toward this goal. Forty-seven attended Ridgecrest. Nine obtained Cards of Accreditation. Welcome to one new organization, Mt. Olivet.

G. A. highlight of the year was the camp at Gardner-Webb. There were 189 girls who went to camp, five of these accepted Christ and fifteen felt called for definite Christian service. G. A. membership is now 564.

Please pray especially for our Sunbeam work. We are keenly disappointed that this work has not advanced as we had hoped. This is where missionary training should begin. "These are our children."

"Christ for the whole wide world, our task has just begun."

MINISTER'S RETIREMENT REPORT

W. W. Abernethy presented the report on Minister's Retirement which was adopted as follows:

Southern Baptist Protection Plan for Pastors is 15 per cent of the salary basis up to a maximum of \$4,000. The State Convention pays five per cent and the church pays 10 per cent, that is, both the church and pastor's dues.

The minister's economic financial security is not in secular work or public charity but in the church. From the beginning, God charged his people with the responsibility of providing the material necessities of life for His minister.

The Protection Plan provides for the minister's wife at his death. And the church is protected also in case of the death or disability of their pastor. Every church should be anxious to be in this plan for their protection and urge that their pastor be agreeable to it.

Pastors are among the group that have the least take-home pay, therefore, all churches should be glad to carry this plan right through the year if they have a pastor or not. It is permitted that it be limited, only the amount on which he pays dues and the number of years participated.

Churches therefore, should see to it that a good average rate of payment be made and that the percentage of \$4,000.00 be paid if at all possible; and pay it if they have a pastor or not right through the years.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The report on the American Bible Society was presented by Rev. Charles Ginn and was adopted as follows:

The Bible is a "must" in missions and evangelism. If the people of the world are to know Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations, they must have the Bible. It is the one basic source of knowledge of Him. The Bible itself is a missionary. It goes, stays and keeps on speaking to people's hearts even after the missionaries have gone.

Every man must have the Bible in his own language. In most countries people cannot afford even the price of printing scriptures.

The American Bible Society translates the Bible, publishes without comment, distributes without profit scriptures for worldwide mission work. For the blind, there is the raised letter system available at a fraction of cost, also the Talking Book Record. The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptist serving with them at home and abroad.

Because the Bible Society serves mission work, and because Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Society for scriptures they need for distribution to their people--Southern Baptist churches give to the American

Bible Society.

The help of every Southern Baptist Church is needed. Has your Church given this year?

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

Rev. M. W. Stallings gave the report on State Missions which was adopted as follows:

There are around thirty three hundred white Baptist Churches with approximately nine hundred thousand members enrolled in North Carolina. We have every reason to believe that these numbers would have far less had there not been a healthy department of State Missions at work among our churches. Now that we have such large numbers there is even a greater necessity for a stronger State Missions Department. Men of vision and spiritual insight are saying today, "Among our greatest needs is to make disciples of the great numbers enrolled in our churches." It is the task of State Missions to provide assistance in developing the teaching, training, evangelistic, missionary, and all phases of a church program. As these needs are met in the local churches, the places for the six hundred needed new missions and churches are being discovered and developed. As these needs are met, the whole of our denominational efforts are strengthened for the carrying out of the Great Commission given to us by our Lord to make disciples of all nations.

There are two very practical ways in which every church can help make state missions accomplish its objectives. First, every church can inform its own membership as to the work of the State Missions program. Second, every church can make a worthy offering, to meet the financial needs. Third, every church can accept the opportunities made possible by the offered services of this department of our Baptist work.

The needs are many which await our ministry through the State Missions program. The opportunities are unlimited. Therefore let us give even more loyal support and cooperation in the future than in the past.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

The report on Home Missions was given by Mrs. Frank Willis and was adopted as follows:

Southern Baptists support a missionary force of more than 2,000 on home mission fields according to Courts Redford, Atlanta, executive secretary of the Home Mission Board.

Redford attributed the gain of 344 in personnel over the previous year to 16 co-operative agreements between state conventions and the Home Mission Board.

The Annie Armstrong Offering and the Cooperative Program provided \$4,151,389.58 for home mission work during 1959.

A milestone was reached in missionary personnel appointment in the adoption of minimum requirements by the Board.

Pioneer missions received about \$1,312,000.00. The Church Loan Division has majored on pioneer areas.

At the end of 1959, 74 city mission programs were in operation. A major emphasis of the City Missions Departments has been on its juvenile rehabilitation programs, Jewish work, and 45 mission center programs.

The 30,000 Movement is progressing toward the 1964 goal. More than 10,000 new churches and missions had been started by May, 1960.

Southern Baptist joined six other North American Baptist bodies in making 1959 a year of evangelism. The Division of Evangelism will give increased emphasis on personal soul-winning and Christian growth.

More than half the home missionaries work with language groups, deaf, and migrants in the United States, Cuba, Panama, the Canal Zone, and San Blas Islands.

Growth in the hospital, institutional, and industrial chaplaincy was reported by the Division of Chaplaincy.

The Home Mission Board became a part of Southern Baptists' advance communication system through a teletype network which connects 25 Baptist offices in 19 cities.

The report of Southern Baptist work with National Baptists revealed that 71 workers employed by the Home Mission Board participated in National Baptist work with Negroes.

The expanding work of home missions depends on personnel, and, during the year, seven new workers joined the staff.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Rev. Guy Johnson gave the report on Foreign Missions in the absence of Rev. L. N. Epley. The following report was adopted.

God has blessed in a marvelous way in the past year in new missionaries appointed. There were 144 appointments in 1959. From January to May 1960 there were 31 bringing the number of Foreign Missionaries in active service to 1,407.

There were 675 urgent request for new missionaries at the end of 1959. Among the most pressing needs are those for people in the field of Evangelism and church development, theological education, nursing, student work, and religious education. Yet, after all we have only scratched the surface when we look at the critical needs of the Foreign fields today.

We now have missionaries in 44 countries. Foreign missions have reached out to six additional countries in 1959.

Missions are carried on through a varying number of institutions on each mission field: churches, schools, hospitals, publication plants, and good will centers. The goal of each is evangelism. There are 2,193 national pastors and most of the churches have Sunday Schools.

The 3,269 churches and 6,332 chapels and mission points report a Sunday School enrolment of 340,336. With 28,228 baptisms during 1959.

Educational work offers a great opportunity for evangelism, and trains a strong leadership. The 1,002 Baptist schools enroll 151,276 students, served by 4,781 national and 304 missionary teachers. Among the schools are 32 theological institutions, and 4 women's training schools. Other schools range from kindergarten to college.

In the medical work there is untold opportunities for soul-winning. This ministry is carried on through personal contacts with patients and their families, devotional services, distribution of literature, and follow-up of visitation after patients leave the hospital.

The largest mission publication centers are the El Paso, Texas plant, which supplies Baptist literature for Spanish-speaking groups in 41 countries, and the Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, plant supplies Bibles and literature in Portuguese. The major plant for Chinese literature is Hong Kong.

Advance must continue. Southern Baptist gave to us Foreign Missions in 1959 \$15,985,116.39. This sounds wonderful, but when we look through the eyes of Jesus, we can see the multitudes lifting their hands and saying, "You haven't offered Christ to me."

TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS REPORT

The report on Temperance and Public Morals was given by Rev. W. M. Owens in the absence of Rev. Harold Brown. The report was spoken to by Dr. Samuel H. Zealy, President of the Christian Action League, and was adopted as follows:

No one would deny the presence of sin among us. Seemingly it is ever on the increase. We know what the liquor traffic is doing to our nation. It has a strangle hold upon millions of our fellow-citizens. It is wrecking individuals, undermining families, breaking homes, influencing legislative bodies, corrupting everything it touches, and at the same time, becoming more and more acceptable in so-called "good" church families. Liquor is connected with over one-half of the highway fatalities. Some 110 million people in America drink alcoholic beverages. Eight million of our people are affected with alcoholism. The liquor traffic in America is producing 1,200 alcoholics per day or 50 per hour around the clock. Alcoholism becomes our number three health problem, following heart disease and cancer.

We realize also that we are living in an immoral nation. This matter of sex has taken the throne in America. The number of illegitimate babies is increasing greatly year after year. If the American public did not have the preventive know how there would be multiplied thousands more babies born out of wedlock. Many church members are guilty of this sin of immorality.

The church has failed to affirm its standards forthright. The pulpit has been slow to offend and eager to please. It is a severe indictment against the church that in the context of a society that considers itself Christian evils flourish with little effective rebuke. We cannot escape the conclusion that the church herself is an underlying cause of their existence in that she has failed to relate the Gospel to them redemptively. How is it that the persons who are exposed to the Christian message Sunday after Sunday can be indifferent to the ills of society with a clear conscience? We need to begin at home and in our churches to raise the standards set forth in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The report of the Nominating Committee was given by Rev. Guy Johnson in the absence of Rev. D. Hoke Coon. The report was adopted and is included in the Associational Directory of these minutes.

A solo, "I Walked Today Where Jesus Walked," was rendered by Malone Thomason.

EVANGELISM REPORT

Rev. Guy Johnson gave the report on Evangelism which was spoken to by Rev. Duncan L. Futrelle, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Spindale. The following report was adopted.

There never was a time when the Gospel of Jesus Christ was not urgent, but many Christians have slow to sense it. If circumstances can shock us out of complacency, then every Christian should be alerted today to the

urgency of evangelism in this Atomic Age.

Southern Baptists have been blessed by God as few people have been blessed in all Christian history. However, along with these blessings there are inescapable responsibilities. We are Christians and we must share with those who are not Christians. We are the children of light and we must share with those who sit in darkness. In his message before the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Miami Beach, Florida, Billy Graham said, "America is the world's greatest mission field." If this be true, and no doubt it is, and if Southern Baptists are the leading Evangelical denomination in America, we must match this hour with total dedication to evangelism.

The Sandy Run Association this past year held one well attended Evangelistic Clinic at First Church, Forest City. Thirty seven churches participated in the Simultaneous Revival. Thirty two of these churches reported 112 Baptisms and 55 Transfers of Letters making a total of 167 additions to our churches during this revival, however, this report is incorrect due to some churches failing to send a report.

Therefore, we recommend:

1. That we strive to reach the "Evangelism Standard of Excellence" for our association annually.
2. That our association have an evangelistic clinic two to six months before the Baptist Jubilee Revival.
3. That our association participate in the Baptist Jubilee Revival, and that we set the annual Baptist Jubilee Revival dates through 1964.
4. That our association shall recognize the associational officers to serve as the Baptist Jubilee Revival Committee.
5. That every church utilize the church council in promoting a perennial program of evangelism within the local church.
6. That every church co-operate with the Baptist Jubilee Revival, and that consideration be given to having at least one other revival during 1961, with emphasis in both revivals being placed upon every member doing personal soul-winning.
7. That each church follow the Revival Plan Book, thus pray, plan, and work to reach the maximum number of lost souls during the Baptist Jubilee Revival and to experience a new depth of spiritual life.
8. That every church co-operate fully with the Training Union in promoting the spiritual growth program, so as to help anchor and mature every member coming into the fellowship of the church.
