THE CONSTITUTION

SANDY RUN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article I — Name

This body shall be known as the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

Article II — Membership

Sec. 1. The Association shall be composed of Baptist Churches of Rutherford County, Cleveland County and Polk County which are now members, and any other Baptist churches which may hereafter be admitted as provided.

Sec. 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented by her pastor and two representatives. Any church with more than fifty members shall be entitled to a messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. New churches may be admitted by a majority vote of messengers present after careful examination and found to be regular in their organization, orthodox in their doctrine, and supporting objects of the Association, State, and Southern Baptist Conventions. Churches are to be accepted under watchcare of the Association for a period of one year in order that the above may be determined.

Sec. 4. The Association may at any time dissolve connection with any church that becomes heterodox in doctrine or disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Sec. 5. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure.

Sec. 6. In case of internal dissention in a church and two parties coming up to the Association, each claiming to represent the church; neither party shall be seated as messengers until the question is decided as to which party is the church in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of messengers present.

Article III — Objects

The objects of the Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence, and spiritual power of the churches and to direct, promote, and develop their energies in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially

along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the State Baptist Convention, and the Association itself.

Article IV - Meetings

Sec. 1 The Association shall meet in annual session on Tuesday and Wednesday after the Third Sunday in October of each year. The Moderator shall call the body to meet in extra session if necessity shall arise.

Sec. 2 The Associational year shall begin October 1 of each year and close September 30 of the following year.

Article V - Officers and Duties

Sec. 1. The officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, and leaders of the organized work in the Association, who shall be chosen annually by a majority present.

Sec. 2. The officers shall perform all duties usually devolving upon such offices in well deliberative assemblies.

Sec. 3. The term of Moderator shall not exceed more than two consecutive years.

Sec. 4. The Missionary of the Sandy Run Baptist Association shall work with and assist the churches and missions of the Association in the promotion of their work and shall be under the supervision of the Associational Board.

Article VI - Associational Board

Sec. 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of the officers of the Association (Article V, Sec. 1) who shall also be the officers of this Board with the Moderator as chairman, the leader of each of the Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music,) the Associational Missionary (ex-officio), the Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representatives on the Baptist State Convention General Board, each active pastor, and two members selected by each active church of the Association.

Sec. 2. This body shall act for the Association in the interim between annual sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, neither taking any action contrary to the will of the Association, nor initiating any new policy or practice binding upon the Association unless specifically so directed. However, in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action so taken shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for its consideration.

Sec. 3. The Board shall be divided into committees with assigned duties (Article VII, Sec. 1.)

Sec. 4. The Clerk will make a report to the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 5. This body shall meet on Monday following the first Sunday in each quarter. The place may be decided.

Article VII - Committees and Their Duties

Sec. 1. **ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD COMMITTEES.** The Associational Board shall be divided by the Committee on Committees into the following committees with their duties.

I. ADVISORY STEERING COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Associational Missionary, the leader of each Associational Organization (Pastors' Conference, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music), Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative of the Baptist State Convention General Board, the Chairman of the Associational Board Committee 2-7, and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

(1) To study and act upon any matters of business of the Associational Board between quarterly meetings of the Board. Any action taken shall be dependent upon the approval of the Associational Board.

(2) To counsel and advise any committee or church in the Association on any suggestion that may be submitted to it.

(3) To counsel, advise, and direct the Associational Missionary and recommend to the Associational Board any necessary changes in any phase of the work.

(4) To assist the Associational Missionary in his work and, in event of his resignation, this Committee shall be responsible for finding and recommending a successor to the Associational Board.

(5) To work with the Associational Missionary in formulating a calendar of activities for the Association.

2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. This Committee and its chairman, consisting of nine members, shall be appointed by the Moderator of the Association soon following the annual session of the Association. It shall, as soon as possible, meet and assign the members of the Associational Board to the various committees, naming the chairman of each except as otherwise provided, and name the Standing Committees and their chairman (Article VII, Sec. 2.) Also, it shall name any other committee assigned to it.

3. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM. This Committee shall be composed of the Associational Chairman of Evangelism and members assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings and organizations of the Association, It shall also encourage and help arrange revivals in every section of the Association and lead in simultaneous revivals. The chairmen will submit a written report to the annual session of the Association.

4. COMMITTEE ON ORDINATIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall serve in an advisory capacity when called upon to assist in the examination and ordination of deacons and candidates for the gospel ministry.

5. COMMITTEE ON LOCATION OF NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. Its duties shall be as follows:

(1) Receive and consider any request by any group for a mission to be organized into a Baptist church and recommend action to the Associational Board.

(2) Be alert to develop any lead that might be given toward the establishment of a new church or mission. Advise with the group, or groups, involved what steps should be taken in the location and organization of a mission or church.

(3) Consider applications from any church or churches desiring membership in the Sandy Run Association and make recommendations to the Associational Board as to what action should be taken.

6. **COMMITTEE ON FINANCES, BUDGET, AND AUDITING.** This Committee shall be composed of the Treasurer as chairman, Moderator, S. S. Supt., T. U. Director, W. M. U. President, Brotherhood President, Church Music Director, and as many other members as the Committee on Committees may deem wise. This Committee shall prepare and recommend a budget for the Associational Program and suggest ways and means to the churches whereby the budget can be raised. It shall also be responsible for auditing the Treasurer's book.

7. **COMMITTEE ON FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE.** The Committee on Committees shall appoint this Committee, naming the chairman, and assign as many members as it deems wise. It shall consider all church or mission requests for pastoral aid and requests to be made to the State or Home Mission Boards for aid or loans in buying church lots and shall make recommendations concerning them to the Associational Board.

8. **COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.** This Committee and its chairman shall be named by the Committee on Committees. It shall bring a suitable report at the annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches to have died since the last annual session.

9. **COMMITTEES TO REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL WORK.** These are Committees on (1) State Missions, (2) Home Missions, (3) Foreign Missions, (4) Christian Literature, (5) Christian Education, (6) Children's Homes, (7) Homes for the Aging, (8) Baptist Hospital, (9) Annuity, (10) Temperance and Civic Righteousness, (11) Stewardship and (12) American Bible Society. These Committees and their chairmen, composed of not less than five members, shall be named by the Committee on Committees. Their duties shall be to inform our people about the work they are chosen to represent and lead in promoting it. The chairman of each Committee shall make a brief written report at the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 2. STANDING COMMITTEES. These Committees and their chairmen shall also be appointed by the Committee on Committees at the time the Associational Board Committees are appointed, but they are not necessarily composed of Board members. They shall serve through the annual session of the Association. These Committees are:

1. **TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of five members and shall report at the annual session. It shall state the time of the next annual meeting of the Association (Article IV, Sec. 1) recommend the place or places of the meeting, and recommend the preacher and the alternate.

2. **PROGRAM COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Associational Music Director, Associational Missionary, and host pastor or pastors. It shall prepare a printed program for the annual meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall in the opening of the annual meeting of the Association present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

3. **RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE.** This committee shall be composed of five members. It shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it may deem expedient. Also, resolutions and recommendations presented at the annual session may be referred to this Committee.

4. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall contact and nominate to the Associational Board in its July meeting for election all the leaders of Associational Organizations (S. S., T. U., W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music) so these leaders in turn can present their helpers to the Association in annual session for election.

The Committee shall also contact and nominate at the annual session of the Association all Associational Officers, (Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian) and the Chairman of Evangelism.

Article VIII - Trustees

Sec. 1. There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer.

Sec. 2. The Trustees and their chairman shall be appointed annually by the Committee on Committees at the time this Committee appoints the Associational Board Committees.

Sec. 3. Their duties shall be to hold title to property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association with the Association or Associational Board's fore-knowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution of the Association, and with State laws as they effect the Association.

Article IX

This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers in attendance, provided that notice is given and the proposed amendment is stated during the first day, but no vote shall be taken upon the proposed amendment until the afternoon session of the second day.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with song and prayer.
2. The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association. He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise provided for.
3. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be considered an authority in all cases not provided for in the Rules of Order: "but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the Presiding Officer may use his discretion subject to an appeal to the Association."
4. Brethren invited to sit with us shall have the liberty of discussion, but not of voting.
5. Speakers shall rise and address the Moderator, and shall confine themselves to the subject under discussion. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the Association.
6. No question shall be discussed without a motion thereon first being made and seconded. Motions made and seconded shall be stated by the Moderator previous to any discussion thereon. If motion contains two or more parts, it shall be divided at the request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote of the body.

ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD REPORT

The report of the Associational Board of the Sandy Run Association was presented by Miss Martha Jean McFarland and was adopted as follows:

The following report gives the important transactions of the Associational Board this year.

On October 24, the Committee on Committees presented its report which was adopted with the necessary changes being made. The Associational Sunday School, Training Union, and Music officers for 1960-1961 were elected as recorded in the Associational Minutes, pages 8-9.

On January 9, the following recommendations coming from the Steering Committee were approved: (1) That the officers for the associational organizations be presented at the July Board meeting rather than the September meeting. (2) That the Annual Session of the Sandy Run Association be changed from the Tuesday and Wednesday following the second Sunday in October to the Tuesday and Wednesday following the third Sunday.

A motion was passed that every church present to its membership that they contribute seventy-five cents per resident member for associational expenses.

On April 10, a motion was carried that the retirement fee of \$18.33 per month be deducted from our associational missionary's salary and that the association pay all his minister's retirement.

On July 10, a motion was passed that the churches pay for their minutes at the rate of fifty cents per copy, and that the check be sent with their letter to the association. The heads of the different organizations were approved for recommendation to the Annual Session. A motion was carried adopting the idea of presenting the 35% Cooperative Program increase for Christian Education to the churches in the association, and the Stewardship and Christian Education committees, with John Lucas as chairman, were appointed to promote this 35% Cooperative Program increase.

On October 3, a motion was adopted that Mr. Carroll secure Mr. Ralph Newman to clean the furnace in the associational parsonage and make the necessary repairs. Application for aid on the associational missionary's salary in the amount of \$900.00 for the coming year was approved.

Plans were announced for an Associational School of Missions during the weeks of September 13-25, 1964, and a motion was adopted that this date be recommended to the annual session for approval.

LOCATION OF NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS REPORT

The following report presented by Rev. Joe Bridges, Chairman of the Committee on the Location of New Churches and Missions, was adopted.

Missions have always been a going business. In the gospel according to Mark 16:15, Jesus said, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to the whole creation". Again, in Acts 1:8, Jesus re-emphasized the necessity to go, "...and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth". Therefore, it is in harmony with the mind and heart of Jesus to begin in the local church and radiate out "unto the uttermost parts of the earth".

Two of our churches started mission Sunday Schools this year. On October 2, 1960 the Sandy Mush Baptist Church started a Sunday School at the American Home for the Aging. On March 5, 1961 Alexander Baptist Church started a mission Sunday School at the Sunset Home for the Aging. We want to commend these two fine churches for the work they are doing.

The Chase Baptist Mission was organized as the Chase Baptist Church on Sunday afternoon, February 19, 1961. This new church is located at the Holland's Store Crossroads, on the north side of the Harris-Henrietta highway. Forty-three people indicated that they desired to become members of the new church and were considered charter members. The church called for its pastor Rev. Melvin Flynn, who had been pastor of the mission.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

Mrs. J.E. Cargill along with Mrs. James Marchman and Mrs. J.D. Crofts presented some of the highlights of the Woman's Missionary Union year. The report was adopted as follows:

"Christian Sharing of Possessions" has been the emphasis in Woman's Missionary Union during the past year. This has meant not just our material possessions, but the sharing of our entire selves. We realize that God wants us, our time, talents and complete dedication. As this has been stressed, we feel that it has naturally resulted in the giving of our material possessions.

It is indeed good to report that our gifts have shown great gains. Particularly in our special offerings have we seen progress. The amounts given for the Foreign Mission offering and the Home Mission offering have exceeded any in past years.

Even though our young people's work is not progressing rapidly, the directors are encouraged that they can witness some fruits of their labors. And these directors must be commended, for they work untiringly.

The Young Woman's Auxiliary has a very bright spot in its year's picture. The Young Woman's Auxiliary of Sandy Mush Church held a Vacation Bible School for colored children of two churches at Mt. Pisgah Church. They had 135 enrolled with an average attendance of 130. The parents and children were most cooperative and very enthusiastic over this undertaking.

Our Girl's Auxiliaries have really been on the move. During Focus Week a banquet for Intermediates was held with 178 attending, and a picnic for Juniors with 250 attending. The Director planned and directed a Girls' Auxiliary Camp at Gardner-Webb College, and 160 girls attended this camp. She also helped to organize seven new Girls' Auxiliary groups.

Sunbeam work is beginning to make some gains. We now have 31 churches with Sunbeam Bands. A Sunbeam workshop was held in February with eight receiving cards of accreditation. However, the highlight of our year of Sunbeam work was the Day Camp at Sandy Run Baptist Church in August. There were 53 eight year old Sunbeams who attended and profited by a day of work and play together.

Five officers attended Inter-racial Meeting in Charlotte last October. Four leaders attended Advanced Leadership Training Course in Greensboro. Three attended Woman's Missionary Union State Convention in Winston-Salem. Three attended Woman's Missionary Union Week at Ridgecrest. Nine attended State Woman's Missionary Union Workshop at Fruitland.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE REPORT

The report on Christian Literature was presented by Rev. Olen Kendrick and was spoken to by Marse Grant, Editor of the Biblical Recorder. The report was adopted as follows:

Have you ever stopped to think that God chose to use "writing" as His means of self-revelation to the world? Where would the world be today were it not for the divinely-written revelation, the Bible? Since God saw fit to use literature to reveal His will, as Christians we obviously have a divine plan to follow. In 1961, this principle still holds true as we think of all the fine Christian literature being written.

When North Carolina Baptists think of their own literature, they naturally think of their state Baptist paper since 1833, the Biblical Recorder. Not satisfied to live in the past though, the Recorder strives to convey its message in an attractive, appealing manner. With the other literature which we have in "Charity and Children", "Home Mission", "Commission", and all the organizational literature, we feel that we are second to none.

Circulation of the Biblical Recorder is the highest in history. At the present time it is more than 78,000, up more than 10,000 over a year ago. The goal for 1964 is 10,000, and the help of every church is needed.

The Sandy Run Association can help greatly in reaching this goal. With 64 churches in the Association, there are only 27 churches which have the Club Plan, 7 churches with the Every Family Plan, 28 churches with NO Recorder Plan. The total number of subscriptions in the Association is 1,121.

It is the Recorder's job to keep North Carolina Baptists informed but please remember that this is a TWO-WAY street. Even though the Recorder may be judged the outstanding paper in S.B.C., if you are not receiving it, you may have no way of knowing what you are missing.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

The report on the Baptist Hospital was presented by Rev. Harold Brown and was spoken to by Everett Gill, representative of the Hospital. The following report was adopted.

The healing of the sick was a part of the work of our Lord while He was here among men. He sent the twelve disciples out saying, "Heal the sick, cleanse the lepers, raise the dead, cast out devils: freely ye have received, freely give". Matthew 10:8.

Our Baptist Hospital continues to try to serve our people in the fullest measure possible. Last year it provided its largest number of days of hospital care and saw the largest number of patients in the Clinics - 78,000 visits to the Out-Patient Clinics, from 96 of the 100 counties in the State, and 75,000 Private Clinic visits.

The new Progressive Care Unit was opened in March, providing 80 beds for patients who do not require the more expensive and intensive care of the regular hospital.

A new type of unit for the sterilization of surgical and other equipment by gas was recently installed. In the X-Ray Department a rapid film developer is now in use which greatly speeds the preparation of x-ray films.

One of the most recent additions is a Pastors' Library given by Mrs. Walter M. Williams of Burlington in memory of her noble Christian husband.

There are some acute needs of our Hospital. One of the most pressing needs is a building to provide classrooms and other facilities for the eight schools operated by the Hospital. These schools are training urgently needed medical personnel and Christian workers in addition to doctors.

The need for enlargement of the overcrowded and seriously limited Out-Patient Department, Children's Center, and Psychiatry section of the Hospital is urgent.

The constant need for Mother's Day Funds for helping Service Patients bear the cost of their hospitalization grows more and more acute. We cannot emphasize too strongly the importance of this Fund and the need for our churches greatly to enlarge their Mother's Day offerings.

A new opportunity to help meet this need is now open in the Service Patients Endowment Fund. Gifts in any amount can be made at any time in one's own name, in memory of a friend, as a memorial to a loved one, or the Endowment can be placed in one's will. All gifts will be gratefully received, appropriately acknowledged, and a permanent record kept of each one. We hope you will think and pray about this and that many will take advantage of this opportunity.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Rev. W.F. McGinnis presented the Historian's Report which was adopted as follows:

The following are the reported activities of progress and history of the churches of the association.

I. CONSTRUCTION.

Bethany built two new classrooms. Bostic, First Church completed a new \$45,000 educational plant. Caroleen built a new educational unit. Open house and dedication service were held on September 17 for Cliffside's new pastorium. Concord held dedication service for their new educational unit named the Margaret Harrill Memorial Building. New Sunday School rooms were built by New Bethel and Sandy Level. Smith's Grove built six Sunday School rooms.

II. IMPROVEMENTS.

Adaville purchased a Bell and Howell projector and screen given by the Glenn Lane family in loving memory of their son Dale, and also installed new lights in the choir. Bostic, First Church remodeled their church basement, painted the sanctuary and put in swinging doors. Caroleen remodeled present building, air conditioned auditorium, and did repair work on the parsonage and the minister of music's home. Chase held ground breaking ceremony on June 4 for the first unit of their educational building.

Ground breaking ceremony was held by Corinth Church on April 30 for their new educational building. Florence purchased a lot for parking. Glenwood painted their church building and had windows in church sandblasted. They also purchased Baptist Hymnals and a piano. The First Church of Harris remodeled the church auditorium putting in new lights and celotex. New pulpit furniture and two heaters were purchased. High Shoals put new flooring and swinging doors in their auditorium. Holly Springs black topped their parking lot and purchased new carpet and drapes. New Bethel installed water and a water cooler. Pacolet Hills remodeled and painted their church and installed new lights. Smith's Grove remodeled their church building, installed gas, graded yard and sowed grass.

III. PASTORAL CHANGES.

The following pastors have come into our association during the year: Rev. W.E. Hill to Broad River, Rev. J.J. Buckner to Camp's Creek, Rev. Wayne Dixon to Drewery Dobbins, Rev. T.W. Estes to Florence, and Rev. Charles F. Smith to Green Creek. Rev. Wayne Bradley to First Church of Harris, Rev. Hulin Roberts to Henrietta, First, Rev. J. Marion Rector to Mt. Pleasant (C), Rev. C.R. Upton to Mt. Pleasant (R), Rev. J.C. Burrell to Pacolet Hills, Rev. H.J. Almond to Pore's Ford, Rev. Billy Bryant to Sandy Springs, Rev. Jim Jones to Temple, Rev. Raymond Crowe to Trinity, and Rev. John Allen to Walls.

Rev. F.M. Barnes resigned the Goode's Creek Church and accepted the Gantt's Grove Church and Rev. Troy Dellinger resigned the Broad River Church and accepted the Gray's Creek Church.

IV. MINISTERS OF MUSIC AND EDUCATION.

The following ministers of music and education have come into the association: James L. Hall as minister of music and education at Caroleen. Donald A.

White as minister of music and education at Cliffside and Miss Sara Perry as minister of education at Spencer.

V. NEW CHURCHES ORGANIZED.

Chase Mission was organized into the Chase Baptist Church on February 19, 1961.

Brief histories of the host churches were prepared by the Historian.

SPENCER

Spencer Baptist Church was organized April 18, 1926 by a group of approximate 200 people. The first house of worship was erected in 1928.

In the ensuing years through 1960, 1,588 members were baptized into the fellowship of the church. Thirty-nine people have gone from the church into full time Christian work, and \$330,000 have been given for all its ministries.

Pastors who have served during the history of the church have been M.W. Huntley, J.A. Brock, Joe Parson, C.C. Matheny, Felix R. Wagoner, W.F. Woodall, and the present pastor, A.B. Bumgarner, who came in November, 1960.

The church building was enlarged in the early forties by adding twenty new classrooms and rearranging the auditorium increasing its capacity to about 500. In 1949 a new sanctuary with a seating capacity of approximately 900 was erected. In 1952 a recreation building with kitchen facilities was built, and in 1954 an educational building with a capacity of 300 was erected.

Presently plans are being drawn for a new educational building to replace the old original building which has become inadequate for present needs. Plans are to begin construction within the next two years.

RACE PATH

The Race Path Baptist Church was organized September 11, 1914 with 27 members. The building site chosen was known then as the Old Race Path. The following churches assisted in the organization: Bethel, Concord, High Shoals, Mt. Pleasant (C), Sandy Run and Trinity. The message was brought by Rev. T.C. Holland; Rev. Z.D. Harrill served as Moderator and Sidney A. Padgett as clerk.

The first building was erected in 1916 with the last services being held in the building on January 13, 1952. The old building was torn down in February, 1952. The present building was completed January 14, 1952, and the first services were held January 20, 1952. A new educational plant was completed in February, 1961 with first services being held in the new building February 19, 1961.

At the close of the associational year there were 519 members.

Pastors who have served the church are as follows: J.F. Lowery, J.R. Matheny, C.C. Matheny, C.D. Barton, C.M. Rollins, G.P. Abernathy, J.D. Harrill, T.M. Hester, C.C. Crow, W.W. Davidson, R.L. Hardin, and J.G. Hall. Joe J. Bridges is now serving as pastor.

Dr. D.P. McFarland, President of the Christian Action League, scheduled to speak on Wednesday, was given the opportunity to speak to the report on the Christian Action League, which report was given on Wednesday.

After the hymn, "Glory to His Name", Miss Sara Perry and Malone Thomason sang, "Be Still and Know".

The Annual Sermon was delivered by Rev. John Lucas. Rev. John Scalf, alternate, read the scripture from Matthew 19:16-26.

A bountiful lunch was served the association by the host church.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session opened with several hymns by the Pastors and Music Directors' choir followed with the assembly singing "O Come All Ye Faithful".

Following worship conducted by Rev. A. B. Bumgarner, the Gardner-Webb College Choir, under the direction of Mrs. Robert Gidney, sang "For the Beauty of the Earth", "Seek Ye the Lord", and "Open My Eyes".

The reports on Christian Education were presented on the Sunday School by Rev. Charles Ginn, Training Union by Rev. Harvey Laughter and Baptist Colleges by Rev. R. G. Melton. These reports were spoken to by Dr. Eugene Poston, President of Gardner-Webb College. The reports were adopted as follows:

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

It is with heartfelt gratitude that we come to make this annual report to the association.

The only purpose or aim of the associational Sunday School officers is to help the churches through the proper use of their Sunday Schools to bring the lost to Jesus, and lead the saved to acknowledge the Lordship of Christ in daily living.

This year our association is reporting sixty-four churches and sixty-four Sunday Schools. Our Sunday School enrolment this year is 15,106 an increase of 178 over last year.

Achievements this past year: 28 Churches observed January Bible Study.

61 Vacation Bible Schools

2 New Sunday Schools (Mission)

We respectfully make the following recommendations:

I. That the Sunday School leadership of each church in our association be urged to:

A. Determine to gain a minimum of 10 per cent in enrolment and 15 per cent in attendance.

B. Move up the pattern of organization by starting new classes and departments.

C. Start a new Sunday School this year.

D. Provide a training program which would include January Bible Study, Preparation Week, and Operation Home Study.

E. Hold a Vacation Bible School.

F. Give priority to personal witnessing and soul winning.

G. Encourage all Sunday School workers to participate in the regular Sunday School meetings and programs in order that our work may be strengthened and that, through cooperation, all churches may carry out their divine commission.

II. That the Associational Sunday School leadership be urged to:

A. Enlist a complete organization.

B. At a clinic train the associational Sunday School officers and plan their work a year in advance.

C. Plan and direct associational group training schools.

D. Provide regular meetings for training and inspiration of Sunday School workers in the churches.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

Two problems continue to plague the leadership of the Associational Training Union. First, there is always the failure of the great part of the membership of our churches to take an active interest in the vital program of training through enlisting in the Training Union. Second, it is becoming more and more difficult to get our people to attend the associational Training Union meetings.

As we glance over the record of the past year, two facts stand out. First, we still have a number of churches in our association without organized Training Union work. Some of these churches do not have pastors living on the field, and many problems face those interested in this work. I know of some of the problems facing our leaders and pastors in these places. In many cases sincere efforts have been put forth to organize and maintain Training Unions. May I urge such

leaders not to give up but to renew efforts to light these church houses on Sunday night. I challenge our stronger churches to go out and assist these churches in this vital work.

Secondly, we need to re-emphasize our study course work, especially methods. We cannot do the job properly without attention to the matter of study. I challenge you to accept these two important jobs for this year and give them priority in your planning and efforts in Training Union work.

May this coming year be a year when the stronger churches in training grow stronger, and the weaker churches in training seek to be strong.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST COLLEGES

You will note that this report has been defined as a "Report on North Carolina Baptist Colleges". Such terms as "Christian Education", "Christian Higher Education", and "Baptist Colleges" are in common usage today. We usually refer to Christian education in the broader sense, denoting every type of training and activity which we provide for the purpose of Christian growth. Our goal then should be to provide our children from very birth with an environment that is totally Christian.

Such a concept requires that we make the training in our homes and churches Christian in every aspect as we prepare our youth for college. Many difficulties and failures in college could be solved and overcome if in the earlier years young people were spiritually prepared.

But in this report we are more directly concerned with the role and ministry of our seven Baptist colleges--Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest, and Wingate.

We are not satisfied to be only a good college, nor even a good Christian college. There must be the added characteristics which are distinctive to the Baptist faith. Our colleges should offer opportunity for a thorough study of Baptist history and doctrine to all its students.

State colleges, by their very nature, work under certain restrictions which prevent them from doing this task. We have said throughout our history that the teaching of religion is the responsibility of the church. Baptists with our homes, churches, and colleges must witness to our faith as it relates not only to the means but also to the ultimate ends of life.

Our forefathers set about to provide colleges where Christian education would be provided not only for ministers and other church leaders, but for leadership in all areas of social activities. For more than seventy-five years after the opening of Wake Forest College, her presidents and supporters often opposed any colleges being operated by the state. Evidently, these men foresaw what has happened with much of higher education in America today. With a secular state providing a secular education we are rapidly losing the early Christian education emphasis. Unless something is done quickly to change this trend in America, we can find little hope for our churches and our Christian homes.

Now what can you do to help?

(1) Be informed and concerned. Read about our colleges, visit them become acquainted with the administration, faculty, and students.

(2) Encourage your best students to attend.

(3) Pray for these schools.

(4) Support the Cooperative Program, especially the Program of Advance.

(5) Promote and support Christian Education Day in your church.

MUSIC MINISTRY REPORT

Our Association at its best has only five full time ministers of music. This year our program has been hurt by the resignation of three of these: Mr. Edwin Chenoweth of the Cliffside Church, Mr. Carlisle Henderson of the Caroleen Church, and Mr. John Blanton of the Florence Church. However, we are happy to report that Mr. Don White has recently come to Cliffside, and Mr. James Hall is scheduled to arrive at Caroleen this week.

Though we have been handicapped, we are glad to report some very worthwhile activities. On Monday night, December 19, at 7:00 o'clock we held a successful Associational Christmas Carol Sing on the Town Square of Forest City with near 150 in attendance. The regional Choir Festival last March was held at the First Church, Forest City, with several choirs of our churches participating and doing their churches and our Association credit, all qualifying to participate in the State Festivals.

One very successful Associational Hymn Sing was held with 208 in attendance.

In addition, our organization sponsored music and singing at various meetings of the other organizations, especially Sunday School and Training Union meetings. We want to mention especially the singing at "M" Night and the Associational Evangelistic Conference.

Moreover, the Associational Music Officers met six times during the year in planning the various activities.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

Rev. L.R. McNeill presented the following report on the Brotherhood, which was adopted.

The 1960-1961 associational year was significant for Baptist Brotherhoods in North Carolina. A new plan of organization went into effect on October 1, 1960. The Brotherhood Department has given special emphasis to leadership training on the new set up. Associational Brotherhood workshops have been held. Also, seventy-five men attended the Brotherhood weekend at Fruitland where they received instructions on how to teach the "Church Brotherhood Guidebook".

A significant event of the year was World Missions Week at our N.C. Assembly near Southport. A total of 1,100 men, women, boys, and girls were in attendance. This week is sponsored jointly by Brotherhood and the Woman's Missionary Union of North Carolina and is an annual missionary emphasis.

In the ten Regional Conferences, the Brotherhood cooperated with the North Carolina director of Retirement Plans and the Annuity Board of the S.B.C. in presenting the Protection Plan for pastors.

During the year the Brotherhood Commission published "Effective Christian Witnessing" by Nelson Tull which is to be used to teach men how to witness.

In cooperation with the Brotherhood Commission and the Baptist Convention of Ohio, the Brotherhood Department sent 20 men to Ohio for special mission work. These men engaged in personal soul winning and conducted services during their week-long stay in Ohio. As a result two new missions were established, and the Ohio Convention has requested that we send 100 men for a similar crusade next year.

The Royal Ambassador Program is undergoing a change in organizational plan beginning October 1, this year. The new Plan will be as follows: Crusaders (9-11 year olds), Pioneers (12-14 year olds), Ambassadors (15-17 year olds).

A fine new State Royal Ambassador Camp is being developed near Asheboro.

The Brotherhood and Royal Ambassadors challenge Baptist men and boys to take a more active part in the churches' efforts to bring the gospel to the whole world. These organizations are worthy of our support.

We believe great things are in store for our Royal Ambassador and Brotherhood

work with Brother Bill Holland, a layman, as president, leading us. We urge our pastors and men to give him and this great work their loyal support.

In our Association there are 24 churches with Brotherhoods and an enrollment of 505 men, and 25 churches with Royal Ambassador Organizations with an enrollment of 456 boys.

Also, approval has been given to request from the Chase Baptist Church for aid on new construction in the amount of Twenty-Five Hundred Dollars.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT

W.V. Carroll presented the report on Associational Missions, which report was adopted as follows:

Visited in 151 services; delivered 42 sermons and addresses; taught 21 Sunday school lessons; held 226 personal conferences and numerous telephone conferences; presented pictures 42 times; helped in one Vacation Bible School and taught one study course; conducted two Associational Vacation Bible School Clinics; attended 37 associational meetings and helped in the Associational Royal Ambassador Camp at Gardner-Webb College; also, attended 20 meetings and conventions outside the Association including the two State Conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention, a week at Caswell, and almost a week at Ridgecrest; published 11 issues of bulletins and mailed 8,121 copies and mailed 5,822 letters and cards; prepared several publicity articles; worked up the Associational Calendar of Activities and had 500 copies printed; helped prepare 690 booklets of "Advance Reports" for the annual session of the Association; and traveled 8,430 miles plus the Southern Baptist Convention trip and some other traveling outside the Association.

Our associational clerk-secretary, Miss Martha Jean McFarland, has done another wonderful year's work for us. She did most of the work in preparing the booklets of "Advance Reports" and the mimeograph work for the bulletins and most of the letters and cards above. Also, she has helped as many as four churches in mimeographing their weekly church bulletins and has done other odd jobs of mimeograph work for the associational organizations and some churches. We are indeed grateful to her.

The associational missionary would like to express his gratitude for your kindness and cooperation in the work.

Rev. Fred Bryant gave notice of a change in Article VII, Section 2 and Item 4 of the Constitution to be voted on the following day.

Walter Zvoda, a converted Catholic, was given the opportunity to speak briefly.

Following special music, "Shall I Crucify My Saviour", by a male quartet, the inspirational message was delivered by Dr. R.P. Lamb, pastor of the Victor Baptist Church, Greer, S.C.

The meeting was adjourned to meet with Race Path Church on the following day.

There were 425 messengers and visitors registered on the first day.

The second day's session opened with music meditation by Miss Jeanne Saunders followed with the hymn, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

After several hymns by the Pastors and Music Directors choir, Rev. Raymond Crow led in a period of worship.

REPORT ON HOMES FOR AGING

The following report on the Homes for the Aging was adopted and was spoken to by William A. Poole, General Superintendent of the Homes.

Our three Homes for the Aging, Resthaven and Hayes Home in Winston-Salem, and the Albemarle Home in Albemarle, have 125 residents. There are 130 on the waiting list.

Lack of room is one of the most acute problems. The Hamilton Home, now under construction in Martin County in the east, will help some in meeting this problem. It will be ready for occupancy in January and will provide for 30 additional residents.

A debt of \$275,000 has been assumed on the Hamilton Home and for the indebtedness of the new infirmary at Winston-Salem. So the great need of increasing the Special Day Offerings and gifts from our churches is evident.

One of the most wonderful gifts made to the Homes is the handsome duplex apartment by Miss Roxie Sides of Winston-Salem. It is being constructed on the Reynolds Park Road in Winston-Salem and will be ready for occupancy this fall.

The average age of the residents is around 80, and Aunt Fannie Drumwright is 100.

During the year fourteen left the Homes for their heavenly home.

Some of the happiest times in the Homes are when friends and members of North Carolina Baptists visit there; so a cordial welcome awaits your visit.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

God doesn't expect his people to use the means and ways of the world to promote His cause. I'm sure the Holy Spirit is grieved, and we commit sin before God, in the way some resort to raise money. AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The report on the American Bible Society was presented by Rev. Troy Dellinger and was adopted as follows:

Please listen to this earnest appeal of a Chinese college student: "We students want to know Jesus. We must have this book". Then listen to another who says: "Your English Bible speaks to my head, but my Chinese Bible speaks to my heart".

Each person must have the Bible in his own language, because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary, but in most lands people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures. The American Bible Society helps missionaries to translate the Bible. It publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost. In cases of special need, at home and abroad, Scriptures are given without charge. The Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists and serves every form of Southern Baptists work around the world.

During 1960 the American Bible Society --

1. Rejoiced that some part of the Bible has been published in 1,165 languages; the full Bible in 221, a Testament in 277 more and a Gospel or other complete book in 667 more.

2. Gave over a million Scripture volumes for distribution by Chaplains to our Armed Forces and Veteran's Hospitals.

3. Observed its 125th Anniversary of supplying Scriptures for the Blind.

4. Enlarged the ministry of the Finger-Fono, a phonograph operated by one finger, with Bible records in the languages needed, for use in areas throughout the world, where many people cannot read. Records are now available in 30 languages and others are being prepared.

5. Helped the Korean Bible Society to realize their long-sought goal of distributing more than a million Scripture volumes in a single year; also, rejoiced in the sustained interest in Japan where, for the last 5 years, Scripture distribution has averaged almost 2 million volumes.

6. Distributed throughout the world a record total of over 23 million volumes of Scriptures.

Southern Baptists support the work because the Society serves mission work, and Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Bible Society for Scriptures they need for their people. In 1960 Southern Baptist churches gave \$151,626 to the American Bible Society; Methodists gifts lead with a total of \$151,934. Gifts from all churches in the U.S.A. totaled \$1,001,768. However, the world-wide need for the Bible is still greater than the supply.

Has your church given this year? Here are suggestions, based on what many churches are now doing. Every church can give at least these amounts each year: Smaller churches, \$10 to \$60; Larger churches, \$60 to \$300; and Great City churches, \$300 to \$600 or more.

REPORT ON BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES

Rev. F.M. Barnes presented the report on the Baptist Children's Homes which was spoken to by John Roberts, editor of Charity and Children. The report was adopted as follows:

The Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina is a Christian agency providing love and care for more than 800 deserving boys and girls annually. These are dependent and neglected children who, for some reason, have found it necessary to live away from their homes.

Your child care ministry is child centered, Christ centered and church centered. It is based on the redemptive plan of God. These children have lost their parents through a number of ways. Workers use all the skills available, plus the help of God, to establish in these children trust in adults, trust in self and trust in God.

Boys and girls live at Mills Home, Kennedy Home, and Odum Home. One hundred twenty five children live in Christian Foster Homes throughout the state. Some mothers who have lost husband and father receive financial grants in the home which enables them to keep and care for their own children. Well trained case workers are spending an increasing amount of time working with and strengthening families.

It became necessary during the past year to reduce the number of children in Foster Home care by 35 boys and girls. At one time we were caring for 162 children in Foster Homes. We now have 127. This trend can be changed only as we have additional income. Many types of service to children in need are being delayed for lack of money.

Our financial support for this year has come from the following sources: Thanksgiving Offering, 33 per cent; Cooperative Program, 32 per cent; Once a Month Offerings, 18 per cent; Special Gifts and Endowment, 17 per cent.

Members of the Board of Trustees, members of the staff and our boys and girls wish to thank you for your generous support. You have given these children love, food, clothing, shelter, schooling, medical care, recreation, guidance, music and hundreds of other benefits.

One third of our support comes at Thanksgiving time. The Thanksgiving Offering goal for 1961 is \$400,000.00. Help this to become a reality.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The following report on the Annuity Board was presented by Rev. W.G. Camp and was spoken to by Tom Greene, Director of Retirement Plans. The report was adopted.

We no longer have a Relief and Annuity Board as we called it in the other years. In 1960 the Southern Baptist Convention, while meeting in Miami, Florida, approved the new name which is now the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. This is now the official name of this Board, and we should use the new name rather than the old.

In 1960 the total new membership in all phases of the Annuity Board's plans increased 9 per cent over that of 1959. On January 1, 1961 total membership stood at 22,578. More than 4,000 participating churches are paying the full 10 per cent dues. By April 1, 1961 six states had enrolled more than 70 per cent of their churches and pastors in the plan. Three states were down to 45 per cent. The District of Columbia stood highest with 94 per cent of her churches and pastors participating. The average of all the states was 63 per cent in the plan.

According to the information as this report is being prepared, in the Sandy Run Association there are 30 churches and 27 pastors participating in the Retirement Plan.

During the year 1960, \$2,754,613.60 was paid to 5,200 retired and disabled ministers and denominational workers and widows. A little more than 4,200 of these were beneficiaries of the plan. The others were on Relief rolls. Since the Board's beginning in 1918, it has paid out a little over \$34,000,000 in benefits.

Fifteen field representatives now serve in 22 states in the convention. These men visit conventions, associations and churches to discuss with any interested group the retirement plans for ministers and denominational workers. The splendid increase in the number of churches and pastors coming into the Annuity Plan has been due largely to the good work done by these field men in various states of the convention. Our Field Representative in North Carolina is the Rev. R.T. Greene, Baptist Building, Raleigh. Brother Greene will be glad to come and discuss these retirement plans with any interested group. Feel free to contact him for an engagement at any time.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

The report on State Missions, which was presented by Rev. M.D. Blanton, was adopted as follows:

Ours is a great state. Within the last few decades North Carolina has made great progress, and she is progressing even more rapidly today. Her economy is growing stronger, her educational system is expanding and her industrial output is constantly increasing. This means that more and more people will have to be employed to continue and extend this potential growth and development.

Such growth and expansion brings responsibility, for progress and responsibility are inseparable. Our people need Christ more than anything else. In a busy, industrial life it is easy to overlook the spiritual needs of people.

Our State Missions Program is the response of North Carolina Baptists to meet this urgent need. Through our State Missions Program we seek to minister to the needs of the people as the needs arise. Today we have approximately 4,600,000 people in the state. About 2,100,000 of these are affiliated with some kind of church. This means that around 2,000,000 above the age of eight years are unchurches. Perhaps 25 percent of these are only nominal Christians. If this be true, then over half of the people in our state are lost spiritually. One out of every four of our white population holds membership in our Baptist Churches.

It is estimated that by 1980, if our present population increase continues, we will have 6,300,000 people in North Carolina. Hence, it is imperative that we win more people than we have been reaching or our unsaved population will reach an even higher percentage. In 1960 we baptized 4,496 less people than we did in 1959. Can we afford to be complacent in the light of such a decline in baptisms in one year?

State Missions promote Christian Education, Baptist Student Work in colleges and universities, a ministry to the "Silent People", Summer Camps, Schools for Pastors, the Christian Action League, Associational Missions, a Department of Church Architecture and other projects such as securing building lots for new churches and other mission services. Through this program of State Missions our Baptist work is both strengthened and extended throughout the state.

As Christians, we must see the need before we will respond to its challenge. May we, as did Jesus in the long ago, "Lift up our eyes and look on the fields" and then give of ourselves, our service and our substance to meet these needs in the name of Jesus, our Lord and Master.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

The following report on Home Missions, presented by Rev. J.I. McMahan, was adopted:

A major share of the personnel and resources of the Home Mission Board are used in 30 states of the northern and western sections of the nation. "We have 1,335 churches in these states where we had only 79 in 1940", Courts Redford, executive secretary of the board, announced. "Our Missions Division spends more than 62 per cent of its budget in this work."

The growth of new churches and missions has been accelerated by the 30,000 movement, a denominational effort to start 10,000 churches and 20,000 missions by 1964. The latest report by C.C. Warren, director of the movement, showed 1,817 started by January 1, 1961.

Hawaii Baptists have asked the Evangelism Division for assistance, and other home mission programs will be started on these islands when requested. An associational missions program will probably be first. A survey of Puerto Rico is being made by the Home Board of needs and opportunities among the island's 1/2 million inhabitants.

Despite limitations of travel between the United States and a tense situation in parts of Cuba, Baptist work grows on the island. Revivals in the four provinces where Southern Baptists sponsor work resulted in 5,116 conversions, and gifts to the churches increased by 20 per cent to \$210,849.00.

Detroit was allotted \$100,000.00 for loans with which to purchase sites and buildings in the "Big Cities" program. The city joined Chicago, New York, San Francisco, and Seattle as areas needing special efforts in financing new churches and missions.

C.E. Autrey, director of the Division of Evangelism, has given a new emphasis to personal soulwinning and year-around evangelism. The division has promoted the Baptist Jubilee Revivals. Baptisms reported by the churches of the Convention totaled 386,469.

Six hundred and sixty four Southern Baptist ministers serve as chaplains for the military, institutions, and industry in the United States. An additional 58 are commissioned in reserve forces, student programs, or the National Guard, according to George W. Cummins, new director for the Chaplains Division. The Chaplains Division reported 14,053 professions of faith.

A home mission budget in excess of \$4 million (60 per cent from the Cooperative program and 40 per cent from the Annie Armstrong Offering) supported 2,035 missionaries during the past year, the largest number ever employed in mission work in the United States, Cuba and Panama. These workers reported 51,463 baptisms.

Despite a record force, urgent personnel needs were announced by Glendon McCullough, personnel secretary for Good Will Centers, Japanese, Russian, Spanish, and Italian work. "We need more than 270 workers now to fill requests, some vacant for two years because qualified personnel have not been found", he said.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Rev. M.C. Swicegood presented the report on Foreign Missions, which was adopted as follows:

At the beginning of 1961 there were 1,480 Missionaries under appointment for service in forty-five countries. Advance in foreign missions calls for sending, maintaining and enlarging missionary staffs, and cultivation of all types of work on mission fields. The objective of the Foreign Mission Board for this year has been to appoint 160 additional missionaries. With the appointment of this 60, bringing the total up to 1,640, the missionary section of the operating budget for 1962 will need to be expanded \$700,000 and necessary increases for programs of work will call for an additional \$400,000.00.

The Foreign Mission Board makes appropriations for objects which have been recommended by the mission fields after very careful study, prayer, and agreement. On this basis the funds used for mission work enable those projects to be undertaken which the missionaries and national leaders consider to be most urgent in their respective fields.

Experience indicates that even the most urgent recommendations will exceed the funds available and therefore only a portion can be provided. The urgency of the missionary task around the world increases with each day. We must bring to this enterprise not only resources in terms of lives and money but increasing spiritual power through prayer and faith. The Foreign Mission Board looks to the Co-operative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas offering for financial resources for worldwide missionary labor. May God grant us increasing liberality in missionary giving to the end that the labor our Lord is expecting in this day can become a reality.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session opened with music meditation by Mrs. Jim Jones followed with several hymns by the Pastors and Music Directors' choir.

Worship was conducted by Rev. J. Marion Rector.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE REPORT

The report on the Christian Action League was presented by Rev. Hoke Coon and was adopted as follows:

The world-renowned Dr. Albert Schweitzer has said, "Drink is commercially our greatest wastrel, socially our greatest criminal, and morally and religiously our greatest enemy". This is true today.

It is estimated that in the year 1960, there were 68,000,000 American adults who drank alcoholic beverages in some degree. Of these, 5,400,000 were alcoholics and another 4,100,000 were heavy drinkers or problem drinkers. Take into account that for each one of these 9,500,000 there are five additional people whose lives are adversely affected by their drinking. Alcohol is a potent factor in the destruction of many homes, and its victims fill our prisons. It is a major contributor to the crime rate in our land which is at an all-time high.

But the story does not end here. Alcohol is writing a very shameful and bloody record on the highways of our land. In 1960 there were 37,600 people killed on the highways of the nation and there were 2,870,000 injured in non-fatal accidents. Some estimates go as high as 75% in the relation of alcohol to these accidents. The Highway Patrol says that alcohol was a factor in more than 50% of the fatal accidents on North Carolina highways last year.

No indictment against this No. 1 enemy can be made too strong.

The Christian Action League is an organization of the evangelical denominations of North Carolina for action in areas of common concern in the moral issues of the day. An Executive Director is employed for full time service in promoting the work of the organization. The financial support of the League comes from donations by the affiliated denominations, from churches and from individuals who are concerned.

In particular, the Christian Action League seeks (a) to unite all who believe in total abstinence from alcoholic beverages to a cooperative effort to agitate, legislate and educate against this social evil; (b) to awaken public interest in

opposing gambling, narcotic addiction, salacious literature and acts of violence and vandalism; (c) to promote programs for the rehabilitation of the victims of alcoholic beverages and other narcotics.

EVANGELISM REPORT

The report on evangelism was presented by Rev. Guy Johnson and was adopted as follows:

These are tremendous days in which we live. Billions are being spent for getting men to the moon, while comparatively little is spent for getting men to God. Multitudes sit in darkness and many in despair while the forces of darkness move constantly in a dedicated abandon toward their objectives. The number of hopeless people - hopeless because they do not know Christ - grows daily. The world's population is increasing by 48,000,000 per year. All religions are winning only 10,000,000 per year.

Many of these lost people live in the territory of our association. They live near our churches. In regard to their need for God they have been deluded by the powers of darkness, and numbers of them dissoluted, by the apathy and lack of dedication to Christ on the part of professed Christians. Surely this is the time for total dedication to Christ in His purpose of winning the multitudes to God.

To move forward we must start from where we are. Our association is the best launching place for new frontiers in evangelism and missions.

Therefore, we recommend:

1. That we encourage ourselves in the Lord our God for the resurging interest in evangelism across our Convention, continuously praying that God may work in us and through us to bring the revival we need.

2. That our association participate in the "Baptist Jubilee Revivals" in 1962 through 1964. Our dates are as follows: 1962, March 18 - April 1; 1963, March 17 - 31; 1964, March 8 - 22.

3. That each church prayerfully and studiously consider participating in the Baptist Jubilee Revival, and that special emphasis in all revivals and week by week evangelism throughout the year be placed upon personal, face-to-face, heart-to-heart soul-winning and faithful teaching and preaching.

4. That all churches make full use of the Revival Plan Book for 1962, 1964, supplied free to all pastors by the Division of Evangelism, Baptist State Convention.

5. That our association have an Evangelism Clinic following the suggested program supplied by the Division of Evangelism. The date for our Clinic is November 27, 1961.

6. That our association recognize the elected associational officers as the evangelism committee, the Chairman of Evangelism to be the Chairman of this committee, and that we pledge our wholehearted cooperation to this committee.

7. That our association send the Chairman of Evangelism to Ridgecrest for the annual conference on Evangelism during Home Mission Week.

8. That we commit ourselves to the following outline of achievement for 1962.

I. CHAIRMAN OF EVANGELISM -- An evangelistic pastor elected to promote perennial soul-winning in all churches.

II. ASSOCIATIONAL EVANGELISM CLINIC.

III. ANNUAL BAPTIST JUBILEE REVIVAL -- Eighty percent of churches participating.

IV. ALL CHURCHES CONDUCTING REVIVALS.

V. EACH CHURCH WINNING AND BAPTIZING NEW MEMBERS.

The Rev. Clifford C. Crow

To Whom These Minutes Are Affectionately Dedicated

C. C. Crow was born in the Big Springs Baptist Church Community in Rutherford County on August 5, 1900. He gave his heart to Christ and joined the Big Springs Church when he was fifteen years of age.

In 1924 he married Minnie Tooney. Later he felt the Lord calling him to preach and went back to school, finishing high school and then going on to Wake Forest College in September, 1930 and graduating with a B.A. Degree in June, 1933.

The Big Springs Church ordained Brother Crow to the gospel ministry on December 26, 1931.

After graduating from Wake Forest College, he accepted the pastorate of some churches in the Kings Mountain Association and later in the Sandy Run Association and alternated in serving churches in these associations. At one time he was honored in being elected as moderator of the Kings Mountain Association.

Brother Crow served the following churches in the Sandy Run Association: Bethany, Bethel, Campfield Memorial, Concord, Mt. Lebanon, Race Path, and Sulphur Springs. He came to the Sulphur Springs Church in August, 1958, and served until his retirement at the end of October of this year, 1962. For the past two years he has also served with honor and distinction as moderator of our Sandy Run Association.

Brother Crow is most faithful and dependable. He has been a great pastor, loved, honored, and cherished by his church members as few pastors have been. Seldom is a man so highly esteemed by fellow ministers and laymen alike. He is a cherished friend and faithful servant of God, greatly appreciated by all of us.

We salute this honored man of God. May the good Lord bless and give this noble and esteemed servant of His many more happy years.

Constitution

Article I — Name

This body shall be known as the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

Article II — Membership

Sec. 1. The Association shall be composed of Baptist Churches of Rutherford County, Cleveland County and Polk County which are now members, and any other Baptist churches which may hereafter be admitted as provided.

Sec. 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented by her pastor and two representatives. Any church with more than fifty members shall be entitled to a messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. New churches may be admitted by a majority vote of messengers present after careful examination and found to be regular in their organization, orthodox in their doctrine, and supporting objects of the Association, State, and Southern Baptist Conventions. Churches are to be accepted under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year in order that the above may be determined.

Sec. 4. The Association may at any time dissolve connection with any church that becomes heterodox in doctrine or disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Sec. 5. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure.

Sec. 6. In case of internal dissention in a church and two parties coming up to the Association, each claiming to represent the church; neither party shall be seated as messengers until the question is decided as to which party is the church in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of messengers present.

Article III — Objects

The objects of the Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence, and spiritual power of the churches and to direct, promote, and develop their energies in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the State Baptist Convention, and the Association itself.

Article IV — Meetings

Sec. 1. The Association shall meet in annual session on Tuesday and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October of each year. The Moderator shall call the body to meet in extra session if necessity shall arise.

Sec. 2. The Associational year shall begin October 1 of each year and close September 30 of the following year.

Minutes of Sandy Run Baptist Association

Article V — Officers and Duties

Sec. 1. The officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Librarian and leaders of the organized work in the Association, who shall be chosen annually by a majority present.

Sec. 2. The officers shall perform all duties usually devolving upon such offices in well deliberative assemblies.

Sec. 3. The term of Moderator shall not exceed more than two consecutive years.

Sec. 4. The Missionary of the Sandy Run Baptist Association shall work with and assist the churches and missions of the Association in the promotion of their work and shall be under the supervision of the Associational Board.

Article VI — Associational Board

Sec. 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of the officers of the Association (Article V, Sec. 1) who shall also be the officers of this Board with the Moderator as chairman, the leader of each of the Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music,) the Associational Missionary (ex-officio), the Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representatives on the Baptist State Convention General Board, each active pastor, and two members selected by each active church of the Association.

Sec. 2. This body shall act for the Association in the interim between annual sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, neither taking any action contrary to the will of the Association, nor initiating any new policy or practice binding upon the Association unless specifically so directed. However, in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action so taken shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for its consideration.

Sec. 3. The Board shall be divided into committees with assigned duties (Article VII, Sec. 1).

Sec. 4. The Clerk will make a report to the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 5. This body shall meet on Monday following the first Sunday in each quarter. The place may be decided.

Article VII — Committees and Their Duties

Sec. 1. ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD COMMITTEES. The Associational Board shall be divided by the Committee on Committees into the following committees with their duties.

1. ADVISORY STEERING COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Associational Missionary, the leader of each Associational Organization (Pastor's Conference, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music), Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative of the Baptist State Convention General Board, the Chairman of the Associational Board Committee 2-7, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and Librarian. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

(1) To study and act upon any matters of business of the Associational Board between quarterly meetings of the Board. Any action taken shall be dependent upon the approval of the Associational Board.

(2) To counsel and advise any committee or church in the Association on any suggestion that may be submitted to it.

(3) To counsel, advise, and direct the Associational Missionary and recommend to the Associational Board any necessary changes in any phase of the work.

(4) To assist the Associational Missionary in his work and, in event of his resignation, this Committee shall be responsible for finding and recommending a successor to the Associational Board.

(5) To work with the Associational Missionary in formulating a calendar of activities for the Association.

2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. This Committee and its chairman, consisting of nine members, shall be appointed by the Moderator of the Association soon following the annual session of the Association. It shall, as soon as possible, meet and assign the members of the Associational Board to the various committees, naming the chairman of each except as otherwise provided, and name the Standing Committees and their chairman (Article VII, Sec. 2). Also, it shall name any other committee assigned to it.

3. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM. This Committee shall be composed of the Associational Chairman of Evangelism and members assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings and organizations of the Association. It shall also encourage and help arrange revivals in every section of the Association and lead in simultaneous revivals. The chairmen will submit a written report to the annual session of the Association.

4. COMMITTEE ON ORDINATIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall serve in an advisory capacity when called upon to assist in the examination and ordination of deacons and candidates for the gospel ministry.

5. COMMITTEE ON LOCATION OF NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. Its duties shall be as follows:

(1) Receive and consider any request by any group for a mission to be organized into a Baptist church and recommend action to the Associational Board.

(2) Be alert to develop any lead that might be given toward the establishment of a new church or mission. Advise with the group, or groups, involved what steps should be taken in the location and or organization of a mission or church.

(3) Consider applications from any church or churches desiring membership in the Sandy Run Association and make recommendations to the Associational Board as to what action should be taken.

6. COMMITTEE ON FINANCES, BUDGET, AND AUDITING. This Committee shall be composed of the Treasurer as chairman, Moderator, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, W. M. U.

President, Brotherhood President, Church Music Director, and as many other members as the Committee on Committees may deem wise. This Committee shall prepare and recommend a budget for the Associational Program and suggest ways and means to the churches whereby the budget can be raised. It shall also be responsible for auditing the Treasurer's book.

7. COMMITTEE ON FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. The Committee on Committees shall appoint this Committee, naming the chairman, and assign as many members as it deems wise. It shall consider all church or mission requests for pastoral aid and requests to be made to the State or Home Mission Boards for aid or loans in buying church lots and shall make recommendations concerning them to the Associational Board.

8. COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS. This Committee and its chairman shall be named by the Committee on Committees. It shall bring a suitable report at the annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches to have died since the last annual session.

9. COMMITTEES TO REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL WORK. These are Committees on (1) State Missions, (2) Home Missions, (3) Foreign Missions, (4) Christian Literature, (5) Christian Education, (6) Children's Homes, (7) Homes for the Aging, (8) Baptist Hospital, (9) Annuity, (10) Temperance and Civic Righteousness, (11) Stewardship and (12) American Bible Society. These Committees and their chairmen, composed of not less than five members, shall be named by the Committee on Committees. Their duties shall be to inform our people about the work they are chosen to represent and lead in promoting it. The chairman of each Committee shall make a brief written report at the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 2. STANDING COMMITTEES. These Committees and their chairmen shall also be appointed by the Committee on Committees at the time of the Associational Board Committees are appointed, but they are not necessarily composed of Board members. They shall serve through the annual session of the Association. These Committees are:

1. TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of five members and shall report at the annual session. It shall state the time of the next annual meeting of the Association (Article IV, Sec. 1) recommend the place or places of the meeting and recommend the preacher and the alternate.

2. PROGRAM COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Associational Music Director, Associational Missionary, and host pastor or pastors. It shall prepare a printed program for the annual meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall in the opening of the annual meeting of the Association present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

3. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of five members. It shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it may deem expedient. Also, resolutions and recommendations presented at the annual session may be referred to this Committee.

4. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall contact and nominate to the Associational Board in its July meeting for election all the leaders of Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music) so these leaders in turn can present their helpers to the Association in annual session for election. The Committee shall also contact and nominate at the annual session of the Association all Associational Officers, (Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Librarian) and the Chairman of Evangelism.

Article VIII — Trustees

Sec. 1. There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer.

Sec. 2. The Trustees and their chairman shall be appointed annually by the Committee on Committees at the time this Committee appoints the Associational Board Committees.

Sec. 3. Their duties shall be to hold title to property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association with the Association or Associational Board's fore-knowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution of the Association, and with State laws as they affect the Association.

Article IX

This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers in attendance, provided that notice is given and the proposed amendment is stated during the first day, but no vote shall be taken upon the proposed amendment until the afternoon session of the second day.

Rules of Order

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with song and prayer.
2. The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association. He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise provided for.
3. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be considered an authority in all cases not provided for in the Rules of Order: "but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the Presiding Officer may use his discretion subject to an appeal to the Association."
4. Brethren invited to sit with us shall have the liberty of discussion, but not of voting.
5. Speakers shall rise and address the Moderator, and shall confine themselves to the subject under discussion. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the Association.
6. No question shall be discussed without a motion thereon first being made and seconded. Motions made and seconded shall be stated by the Moderator previous to any discussion thereon. If motion contains two or more parts, it shall be divided at the request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote of the body.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

After the adoption of the following report on the Woman's Missionary Union, Mrs. J. E. Cargill, Mrs. James Marchman, Mrs. Earl Baldwin and Mrs. Earl Jolley presented a skit on the organization and history of Woman's Missionary Union in the Sandy Run Association.

Fifty years the women of Sandy Run Association have "Labored Together with God." In April the women celebrated their Golden Anniversary when they met in the Mt. Pleasant (C) Church. We count it the very greatest of privileges to serve for a half century in the immeasurable missionary program of the church.

Last year in October a Leadership Training course was held and approximately 150 women earned cards of accreditation. Our leaders are more and more becoming aware of the proper training being necessary to do their work well.

Foreign Mission and Home Mission offerings increased again. It is good to report this progress concerning stewardship of possessions.

More churches were represented at the State W. M. U. meeting in Asheville in March than we have known of in past years. This indicates more interest in the work. The same was true of W. M. U. Week at Ridgecrest. The representation was good. Seven ladies of the Executive Board attended the overnight conference and Prayer Retreat at Fruitland, September 7-8.

An Associational Prayer Retreat was held at Walls Church, Saturday, September 15. This period of prayer and meditation was a wonderful spiritual edification. Already one Y. W. A. organization has come into being as a result of this meeting.

Woman's Missionary Societies are striving harder for rating on The Aims for Advancement. This year 9 societies have rated Advanced (not all of the reports are in). So far, this is the largest number to attain this rating. We welcome most heartily one new W. M. S. from Harris Church.

Bethel Church in Ellensboro was hostess to the Associational Y. W. A. during Focus Week in February. Miss Bertha Smith, retired missionary

of China and Formosa, spoke to about ninety girls and their leaders. After the program the church entertained with a tea and fine fellowship was enjoyed during this social period.

Girl's Auxiliary work is making progress. Last year on October 1 there were 9 Approved, 6 Advanced and 2 Honor organizations. This year's report is not yet available. "Queenly Quest" was the theme for the Intermediate G. A. banquet in May at Forest City First Baptist Church. 160 girls and their counselors attended. The Juiner G. A. meeting and picnic at Sulphur Springs Church was attended by 296 girls and counselors.

Two new Sunbeam Bands have been organized this year. The highlight of Sunbeam work was the Sunbeam Day Camp for Eight year olds. This was held at Trinity Church with 64 children and 19 workers attending and enjoying their day of work and play together.

This year is our Diamond Anniversary in W. M. U. It is to be a year of prayer. We earnestly implore all church members to join us in praying for the mission cause.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE REPORT

Rev. M. W. Stallings presented the report on Christian Literature which was spoken to by John Roberts, Editor of Charity and Children. The report was adopted as follows:

Projected pictures are making a great impact upon life today, but the printed word still remains the most common and widely used news medium. The world is being filled with words coming from the printers' presses. The Christian's concern should be for greater distribution and reading of the printed word that relates us to Christian causes.

The most urgent need today is a return to the Bible and read until our minds and hearts become conditioned with God's truth. For it there is no substitute, no equal. But with the Bible as a source, much writings of a Christian nature are available.

A natural reaction for lovers of God's Word will be an interest in Christian truth in action. Here our denominational publications fill a glorious service. George Truett was surrounded in his home with good books and Baptist publications such as the "Religious Herald," "The Biblical Recorder," and others. Therefore, the names and actions of great Christian leaders became common knowledge to a growing lad. It is almost certain that such yielded much influence for good in his life.

The Biblical Recorder has been a tool for progress for 130 years among North Carolina Baptists. It is even more so today. The same can be said about Charity and Children since its beginning. Every Baptist home should have these along with the Home Mission and Commission magazines. They are within reach of every home financially and otherwise. The doors of opportunity are open, let us move in and receive the blessings of Christian related reading.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

The report on the Baptist Children's Homes was presented by Rev. F. M. Barnes and was adopted as follows: Miss Janice Lewis, student at Gardner-Webb College and a former resident of Mills Homes, spoke to the report.

Building a better tomorrow has always been the dedicated concern of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. Today's children will become the adults who shape tomorrow's world. No task is more important than helping a child, hurt by life, to grow into healthy, well-adjusted, responsible citizenship.

During the past year, 848 boys and girls were served by the Baptist Children's Homes. In addition to those already in care, applications were received for the admission of 646 other children. We had space and money sufficient to admit 170 of these — leaving 476 for whom no room was available. Through an increased Thanksgiving Offering provisions can be made to expand our foster home program to meet the needs of these children.

Increasingly, your Homes are being called upon to serve children who are disturbed and emotionally ill. It is hoped that a step can be taken, within the year, to begin to provide, on a small scale, such services at the North Carolina Medical Center at Chapel Hill.

For the first time, income to the Children's Homes through the Co-operative Program exceeds that of the Thanksgiving Offering. This source of income meets one third of our operating budget and is greatly appreciated. At the same time, the Thanksgiving Offering continues to be vital to our existence, providing 30 per cent of income. We sorely need an increase of one hundred thousand dollars through the Thanksgiving Offering this year. This would enable us to provide a Christian home and care for an additional 125 children.

We owe a debt of deep gratitude to our friends whose genuine concern for the welfare of our children makes this help possible — especially our Baptist people. You have afforded hundreds of boys and girls opportunities and privileges which they otherwise could not have had.

You are invited to be among the readers of *Charity and Children*, our official publication, and thus stay informed of our child care ministry and other denominational endeavors throughout the year.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Rev. Carl G. Mauney presented the Historian's Report which was adopted as follows:

The following items of historical interest and indicated progress were reported by the churches:

I. CONSTRUCTION

Chase constructed first unit of educational building, holding first service December 24, 1961. Corinth went into new educational building January 7, 1962 and held dedication service on that day. Harmon Street

built five classrooms. Glenwood built two classrooms. The pastorium at Goode's Creek was completed and occupied. Trinity built a new pastorium near the church.

II. IMPROVEMENTS

Adaville enlarged the baptistry and installed draw drapery for baptistry. They also enlarged and beautified the foyer, and purchased a public address system. Caroleen completed the new educational building and remodeled the present building. They held open house on June 24, 1962. Chase purchased new pews and a piano. Florence installed wall to wall carpeting in the auditorium. Harmon Street installed rest rooms and a baptistry. Pore's Ford installed a new roof on church and new lights in auditorium. Smith's Grove installed new pews and pulpit furniture in the auditorium and painted the inside of the building. Temple installed wall to wall carpeting in the auditorium and recessed lights over the choir in front of the rostrum. Drewery Dobbins dedicated a new baptistry April 1, 1962. Mt. Harmony remodeled the pastorium.

III. PASTORAL CHANGES

During the year following men have become pastors of the churches indicated: Harold Delozier — Big Springs; Francis Dobbins — Cane Creek; Charles Hamrick — Chase; Bobby G. Deviney — Drewery Dobbins; Elwood R. Orr — Forest City First; James Estep — Goode's Creek; Paul F. Dotson — Mt. Harmony; Cecil Cothran — Shiloh, and Frank Hollifield — Wilson.

IV. OTHER ACCOMPLISHMENTS

At Caroleen the Juniors won in the memory work tournament. Caroleen led the association in study course awards. Also, the History committee gathered facts for a history of the Church. This was published and one given to each church family. At Glenwood a young people's Sunday School department was begun along with two other new classes. A Training Union department for young people was also begun. The Trinity Church celebrated the Fiftieth Anniversary of its organization. First Broad voted to go to a full time program.

HOST CHURCH HISTORIES

Brief histories of the host churches were prepared by the Historian.

Caroleen

The Caroleen Baptist Church was organized in 1896 with 38 members. From the beginning it has been active in home, state and foreign missions. It has consistently played an intregal role in the work of the association.

The present membership is approximately 600 with Sunday School averaging 250 to 300. A building program has just been completed during which time approximately \$70,000.00 was spent for new educational space and improvements on the present plant. The present pastor, John H. Scaff, Jr., has served the church for the past three years.

Sandy Run

Sandy Run Baptist Church was established in 1772. The records state that members were credited with giving pence and shillings, indicating the use of English coins before the Declaration of Independence in 1776.

In the beginning meetings were held in the homes of members and no pastor is mentioned until February 3, 1787. Brother W. M. Camp was the first pastor.

In October, 1803, Brother Drewery Dobbins became pastor and served 44 years until his death, May 19, 1847. The Drewery Dobbins monument was unveiled at Sandy Run, December 20, 1893. The message was delivered by the Rev. A. C. Dixon of New York City.

The Broad River Association met at Sandy Run in 1816 and Elder Luther Rice, a pioneer agent for the Foreign Mission Board, preached a missionary sermon and a public collection was taken up for the Mission Board.

In 1946 Sandy Run voted to pay \$1,000 yearly toward the support of a Foreign Missionary, Miss Frances Roberts. In 1955 they voted to support Miss Roberts full time.

Sandy Run has erected five known churches, two of which were destroyed by fire. Twenty known pastors have served Sandy Run in its 190 year history. The Rev. W. G. Camp served 20 years and was the first full time pastor. The present pastor is the Rev. Charles Ginn.

Sandy Run feels honored to be the Mother Church of the Sandy Run Association.

Following the hymn, "O Master Let Me Walk With Thee," Dr. Hoyt Blackwell, President of Mars Hill College, spoke to these reports which were adopted as follows:

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The Associational Sunday School Organization has for its aim helping and strengthening the local Sunday Schools. The best way to do this is through regular monthly associational meetings and for the Sunday Schools to invite the Associational Sunday School workers to help them with their problems and to make suggestions.

This past year we had three fifth Sunday afternoon meetings. They were meetings combined with the Brotherhood and Training Union. These being combination meetings and being so infrequent were not too effective.

Last year we set some goals as follows :

500 awards in category 17, but through June only nine churches had attained 262 awards.

50 churches observing January Bible Study Week, but only 28 observed the week, the same number as last year.

10% enrolment increase, but we made an increase of only 166.

A goal of 64 Vacation Bible Schools, but there were only 60.

20 churches holding Preparation Week, but only 8 observed this week, which was less than last year.

A goal of 10 Standard Sunday Schools, but we have no report of any.

We hope this organization will move forward in a greater way this new year.

REPORT ON TRAINING UNION

This has been a good year in Training Union work. The theme, "Lengthen and Strengthen" was followed for the year.

"M" Night was held at the Spencer Baptist Church, with 25 pastors, 30 Training Union directors and 35 churches with a total of 595 present. Rev. George Story, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Clover, S. C., brought the message.

The ten entering Junior Memory Work were: Adaville — Eddie Morrison (4 year winner), Mary Ann Lovelace; Sandy Run — Floyd Ginn, Gwen Bridges, Linda Holland, Dean McBrayer, and Jerry Goforth; Caroleen — Barbara Allen, Wilton Price, Cathy Pearson. All were sent to the Regional Convention at Elizabeth Baptist Church Shelby, on April 17, 1962, and were later sent to the State Regional meeting.

Rev. Elwood Orr brought the inspirational message at the Mass meeting at Race Path on September 17, 1962. There were 9 directors and 14 pastors present.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

All seven of our Baptist colleges opened last fall with their largest enrolments: Campbell — 1,429; Chowan — 752; Gardner-Webb — 611;

Mars Hill - 1,099; Meredith — 778; Wingate — 912; Wake Forest — 2,866; making a total of 8,447. Approximately $\frac{2}{3}$ were members of Baptist churches. About a thousand of these are preparing for special Christian service. In addition to these, hundreds of laymen and laywomen are being prepared for their chosen vocation, giving their Christian witness in every walk of life.

The total operating budget of the colleges during the year was about \$12,000,000. Of this amount, the Cooperative Program paid about 5%. Nearly one-half of the operating costs are paid by students and other sources. In the light of spiraling costs and expanded student bodies, the colleges face very crucial financial needs in the future. In order to meet the needs of our colleges, it will be necessary for more churches to increase their Cooperative Program giving by 35%.

The colleges are deliberately and continually seeking to illuminate the total educational process with the atmosphere of the Christian faith. In addition to Christ-oriented teaching, opportunities are provided daily and weekly worship. On each campus is a qualified director of religious activities whose responsibility is to counsel with students and faculty, as well as to correlate and promote a program of voluntary religious activities designed for spiritual growth.

The future of Christian education is at stake today. With increased state and federal interest in an aid to higher education, more and more students will attend state institutions. Our taxes will grow correspondingly higher. These state colleges by their very nature cannot perform the task of Christian education.

Into this expanding sea of secular education, Baptists must give witness to our faith. Let us not oppose other forces operating in the field of higher education, but rather undergird and strengthen our own institutions that they may do their work and do it well.

You can support your colleges by:

- (1) Acquainting yourself with your colleges. Visit them, read about them, invite the students and faculty into your church to conduct services.
- (2) Encouraging your finest students to attend. Be sure that they apply early.
- (3) Praying for the schools — the presidents, administration, faculty, trustees, and students.
- (4) Increasing your Cooperative Program giving 35% this year.
- (5) Observing the Christian Education Day, Father's Day — in June.

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

The following report on Associational Missions was presented by W. V. Carroll. The report was adopted.

It is difficult to report on all the things in Associational Missions. Some of the things are in the realm of feelings, spirit, and attitudes which have been about the finest the past year that the missionary has experienced. The hearty welcome he receives as he visits the churches is often heart warming. For this he is indeed grateful.

The missionary has been fairly active during the year. He has visited in 150 services; delivered 44 sermons and addresses; taught 27 Sunday School classes; presented pictures 35 times; conducted 5 morning devotions and 5 vesper services; held 191 individual and committee conferences and numerous telephone conferences; conducted two Associational Vacation Bible School Clinics and helped in one Vacation Bible School and the Associational R. A. Camp at Gardner-Webb; attended 46 associational meetings and 21 meetings and conventions outside the Association, including Associational Missionaries' Week at Mars Hill College and most of Home Missions Week and most of one Sunday School Week at Ridgecrest; helped in a week's School of Missions; published 11 issues of bulletins and mailed 7,813 copies and 5,765 letters and cards were mailed from the office; traveled 8,558 miles.

Miss Martha Jean McFarland, our most efficient associational clerk-secretary, has done a wonderful work this year. She has done the cutting of most of the stencils and just about all the mimeograph work. She has mimeographed two or three churches' bulletins every week during the year, and she cut the stencils and did just about all the preparing of the "ADVANCE REPORTS" booklets (about 700 of them). We are greatly indebted to her.

REPORT ON MINISTER'S RETIREMENT

Rev. John Allen presented the report on Minister's Retirement which was spoken to by Rev. Guy Cain, Secretary of Retirement Plans. The report was adopted as follows:

A total of \$2,879,816 was paid in benefits by the Annuity Board in 1961. More than \$2,654,222 of this went to around 4,500 ministers, denominational workers and their families who participated in one of the Board's retirement plans. The remaining amount was paid in relief benefits to 826 aged ministers and widows. During the Board's 43 years of operation, it has paid out benefits totaling more than \$37,304,916.

Total membership in all plans of the Annuity Board was 23,214 on January 1, 1962. In 1961, 1,808 new members were enlisted in the Southern Baptist Protection Plan and 789 churches were enrolled. At the end of the year, 64% of the churches in the convention were participating in the Board's Program. Of this number, 43% were paying total dues for both church and pastor. The Institution Protection Program, for employees in colleges, hospitals, orphanages and other institutions of this type, enlisted 32 institutions in 1961.

According to the protection plan certificate, a person must join within a year after he begins denominational work or after his 25th birthday, which ever is later. Delay means reduced benefits for the family. Delayed penalty has been waived for those who join before January 1, 1963.

In the 1961 report we had 30 churches and 27 ministers in our association participating, but we have had a loss, and figures now stand at 27 churches and 24 ministers. We could stand an increase on this, and if you are going into the program, it will pay you to do so before January 1, 1963.

The Annuity Board now has 14 field men working in 21 conventions. Guy Cain, field representative for North Carolina, has his offices at the state convention headquarters, 301 Hillsboro Street, Raleigh. Contact him for meetings in your church.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

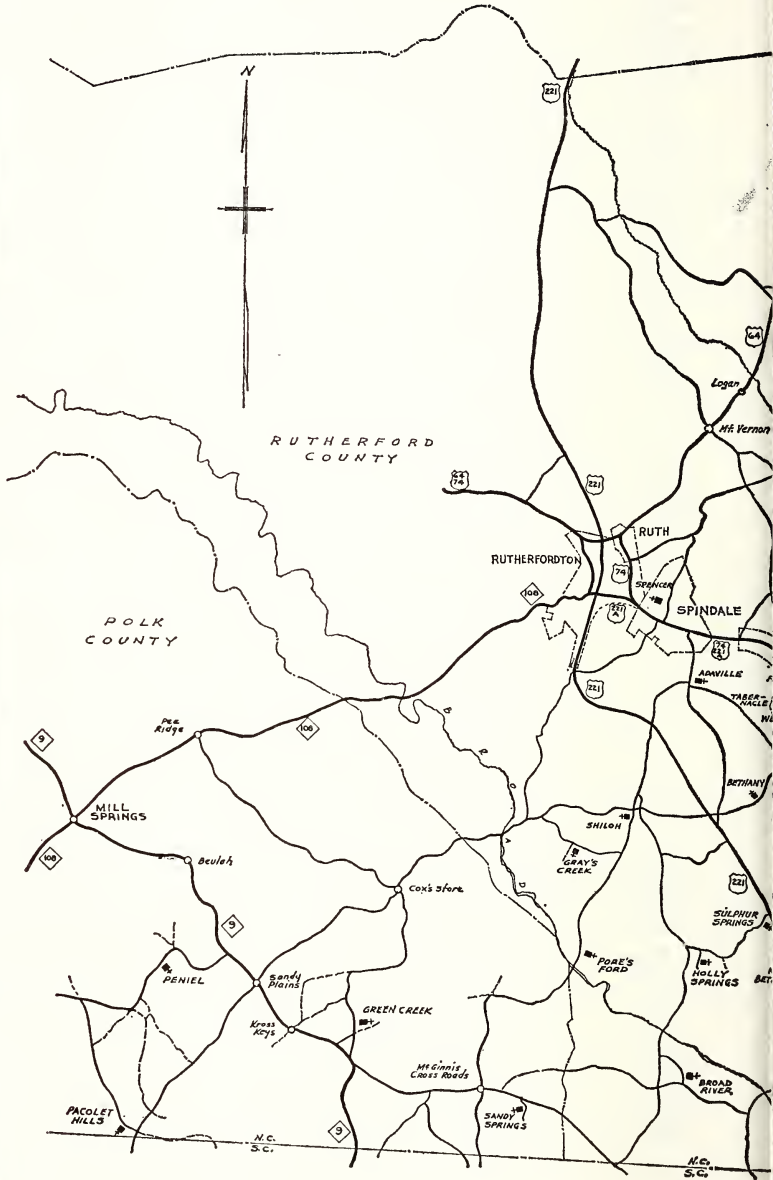
The report on the Baptist Foundation was presented by Rev. John W. Lucas and was adopted as follows:

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation was authorized by the Baptist State Convention in 1919. The Board of Directors organized for business in 1920. From then until the present, the Foundation has had irregular promotion.

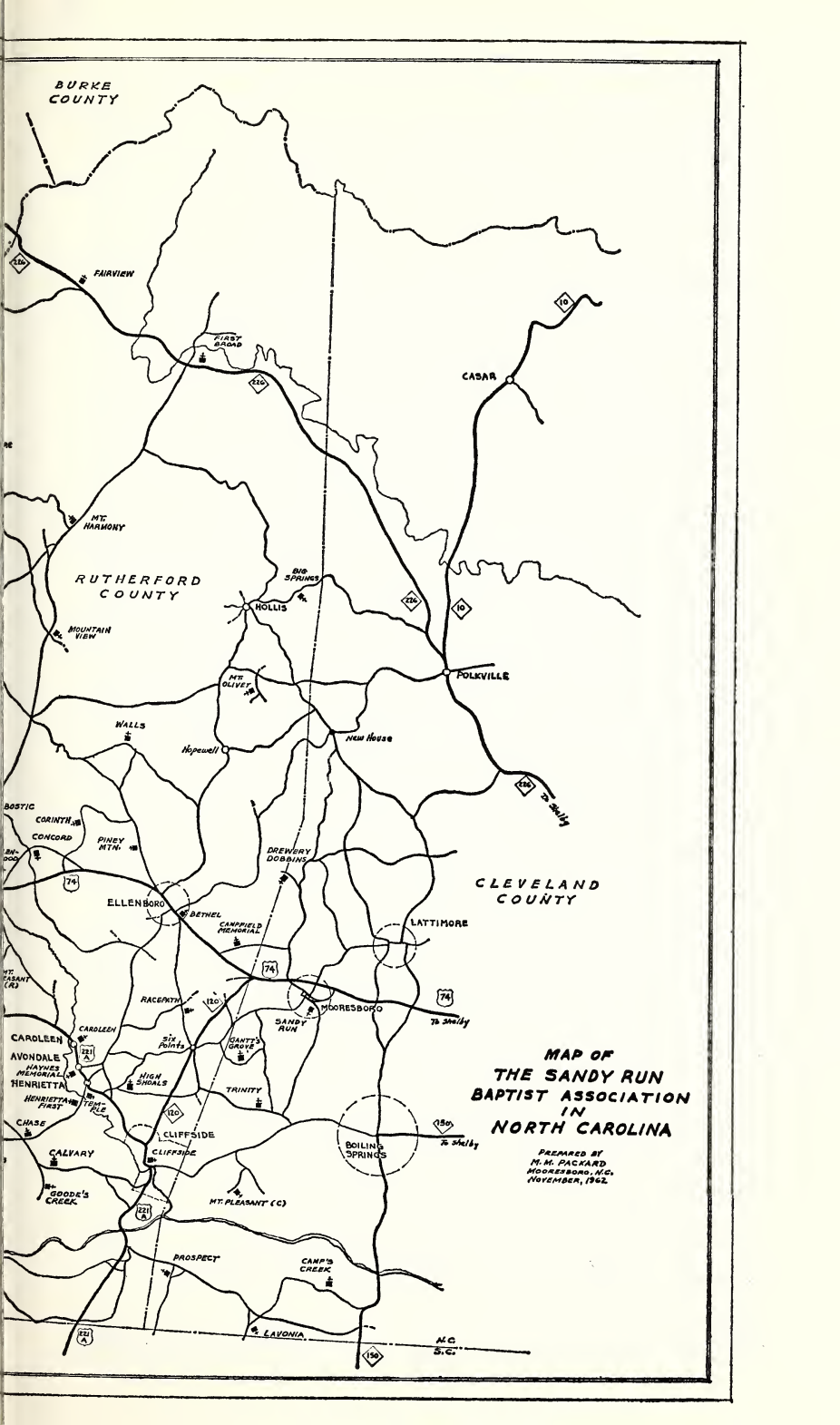
The Committee of 25 recommended to the State Convention in 1959 that the Baptist Foundation be fully staffed and activated. It requested the Convention to adopt a budget providing for a full-time executive secretary, with the necessary travel, office expenses, etc. It was not until July 1 of this year that a full-time executive secretary was employed. The total assets of the Foundation as of June 30, 1959, were \$245,131.32. The total assets as of June 30, 1962, were \$303,186.66. In these past three years our total assets have gained \$58,055.54.

What is the Baptist Foundation? The North Carolina Baptist Foundation is an incorporated agency of the Baptist State Convention of North

Carolina. It was created by the Convention for the purpose of procuring endowment funds and for administering said funds for all institutions and agencies owned and controlled by the Convention. It is independent of the cause it serves, but committed to its best interests. It is not a competitive agency, but a service agency dedicated to the task of undergirding all our Baptist work.

Funds usually come to the Foundation through one of five channels:

(a) Through a CHRISTIAN WILL. In his will a person leaves all or part of his estate with the Foundation for some Baptist cause. Of course, the Foundation then receives its share when the estate is settled.

(b) Through a LIVING TRUST. A person makes a donation to the Foundation while he is living. The Foundation then administers the fund and directs the income to the Baptist agency of his choice. This allows the donor to see his gift at work.

(c) Through a MEMORIAL TRUST. A person makes a gift to the Foundation in memory of a loved one and instructs the Foundation to place the income from it to one or more Baptist agencies.

(d) Through a LIFE INCOME TRUST. A person makes a gift to the Foundation and specifies a Baptist agency as beneficiary, but requests the income for himself as long as he lives. This permits him to receive the earnings to the end of his life and to know the beneficiary of his charity after his death.

(e) Through LIFE INSURANCE. A person takes out a policy in some amount in the name of the Foundation and designates the Baptist cause as irrevocable beneficiary.

HOMES FOR AGING REPORT

Rev. L. N. Epley presented the report on the Homes for the Aging which was spoken to by Rev. Clyde Chapman, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Spencer. The report was adopted as follows:

The past year in our North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging has been one of great blessing. Of unusual significance has been the opening of our fourth Home, the Hamilton Home, located in Eastern North Carolina, and enabling us to minister to 30 additional people. The residents there are supremely happy and are enjoying the abundant life in this beautiful new facility.

Over the past eleven years we have increased by 8 times our ability to minister to the aging in our midst. In the beginning, there were 20 residents, and now we are able to give loving care to 160 persons in our four Homes — Resthaven, and the Hayes Home, in Winston-Salem, the Albemarle Home, at Albemarle, and the Hamilton Home, at Hamilton.

The need for more space is most urgent and pressing. Today there are 138 applicants on the waiting list. We will want to move forward, therefore, as rapidly as funds will permit in meeting the crying demands of our ever-growing population of aging people who need our care.

The Special Day Offerings from our churches are at an all-time high and are likely to go beyond all previous offerings by the end of the

fiscal year. We want to thank all who have had a part in these vital offerings, and we would urgently appeal to each church to continue giving as liberally as possible through this vital medium. Ninety per cent of the residents who live in our four Homes are financially needy people and are sustained by the Special Day Offerings from our churches each year.

The plea of the elderly person in our midst, "Cast me not off in the time of old age," is one that cannot be lightly brushed aside, but one that must continue to challenge the highest and holiest in every North Carolina Baptist as we move forward in this great ministry which God has committed to us.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Rev. Joe Bridges presented the Stewardship report which was adopted as follows:

Stewardship is a reflection of our total commitment to Christ. Without good stewards, the work of our Lord would go wanting. In I Corinthians 4:2 Paul says: "Moreover, it is required in a steward that a man be found faithful." We automatically become stewards when we give our lives and hearts to Christ.

Jesus said, "Not every one that sayeth unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven." These few words will serve as a reminder to all of us that to be a Christian is no small matter.

Stewardship in our Association is an interesting study. I have gleaned these figures from past associational minutes. I would like to share them with you, so that you too might see something of the growth of our Association in one area of our Stewardship.

In 1959, our total receipts were \$738,789; in 1960 our receipts were \$818,741; in 1961, \$824,972. Our expenditures for missions in 1959 were \$146,537; in 1960, \$254,653; in 1961, \$160,582. Our gifts through the Co-operative Program in 1959 were \$82,192; in 1960, they were \$88,303; in 1961, they were \$90,454. In 1950, our churches paid out for all purposes \$837,657. These figures are mere statistics, but they come to life when we realize they represent a part of the lives of our people.

It is through Christian stewardship that God expresses himself. If we are poor stewards, we are poor witnesses and poor Christians. In the light of the needs of our day and the heart of God who gave His son, can we afford to do anything less than our very best?

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The American Bible Society Report was presented by Rev. J. J. Buckner and was adopted as follows:

The American Bible Society's purpose is to encourage the wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and without purpose of profit, to every man on earth in whatever language he may require.

"Sharing Christ with the whole world" is the aim and theme of the Baptist Jubilee Advance Program, and sharing the Bible with the whole world is an essential part of this Advance Program.

If the people of the world are to know Jesus the Christ, they must have the Bible in their own language. The Bible is a missionary itself, and it can go where the human missionary can not go. It can stay where the human missionary cannot stay, and it can keep on speaking after the human missionary has gone.

During 1961, the American Bible Society has:

1. Rejoiced that some part of the Bible has been published in 1,181 languages; the full Bible in 226, a Testament in 281 more and a Gospel or other complete book in 674.

2. Distributed a record total of over 24 million Scripture volumes in over 100 countries on 6 continents.

3. Realized anew, from sharp increase in Scripture distribution in Cuba and Congo, that the demand for the Bible often rises dramatically in areas of political tension and revolution.

4. Continued to enlarge the worldwide ministry of the Finger-Fono for use in areas where many people cannot read.

5. Given almost a million Scripture volumes for distribution by Chaplains to our Armed Forces and Veterans Hospitals.

6. Expanded its distribution of Scriptures to persons of special needs such as Cuban refugees; hurricane and flood victims; migrants and others.

Southern Baptist support the work of the Society because the Bible Society serves mission work, and Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for their people.

In 1961 Southern Baptists gave \$164,342 to the Society. Following is a suggested plan for contributing: Small churches, \$10-\$60; larger churches, \$60-\$300; and great city churches, \$300-\$600.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Rev. Wade Huntley presented the report on the Baptist Hospital which was spoken to by Dr. W. K. McGee, Director of Denominational Relations for the Baptist Hospital, Winston-Salem. The report was adopted as follows:

The services of our Baptist Hospital are subject to heavy demands which grow heavier year by year. Last year the already overcrowded clinics of the Out-Patient Department received a new high of 83,000 visits

from 96 counties of the state, sixteen other states, and two foreign countries. Two-thirds of these were by our Baptist people.

One of the most pressing needs is the enlargement of the facilities of the Out-Patient Department. Along with this is the urgent need for a building to provide adequate and unified facilities for the Hospital's eight schools for the training of skilled nurses, technicians, and other medical personnel, all of whom are in short supply and are essential to good medical care in our local hospitals and communities.

The new Progressive Care Center is attracting the attention of hospital authorities over the country. Patients have been most pleased with it. The trustees and administration greatly regret that the Hospital does not have sufficient funds to permit the admission of Service Patients to this fine facility.

The Pastors' Library now contains well over 100 volumes among the best books in various fields of Christian thought and pastoral work. It can be of great value to pastors and they are invited to use it. It is located in the Medical School Library.

The care of Service Patients remains at the heart of the work of the Baptist Hospital. If a doctor is making the arrangements for a patient he should be told to make clear when he calls or writes if it is a Service or Clinic Patient. Mother's Day money cannot be used for Private Patients.

The Mother's Day Fund is the foundation of the financial aid given Service Patients. The Hospital tries to help the most needy cases as much as possible, but the funds have not been sufficient to give as much as is needed in many cases. In other cases of real need it has not been able to give any help, except the free services of the doctors and reduced rates on other items, such as X-rays, which consideration is given all Service Patients. We must remember that the help given is limited by the Mother's Day gifts of our churches.

Our gifts from 53 churches were \$4,455.44. We trust all our churches will participate in this worthy cause in the new year.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

The following report on State Missions, presented by Rev. Olen Kendrick, was adopted.

State Missions includes no less than 17 ministries, all under the direction of the Division of Missions. Some of these ministries are: The reaching of 200,000 people through the School of Missions; The 30,000 Movement establishing 556 New Missions and Churches in the State; One hundred and sixty-one Missions and Churches aided through Pastoral Assistance, new Church lot gifts and Church loans.

State Missions is the oldest offering among North Carolina Baptists. For more than one hundred years it has been a part of North Carolina Baptist life.

It is commendable that special offerings for Home and Foreign Missions have reached several times the amount of the State Mission Offering in our State, but North Carolina Baptists have an obligation here at home which we cannot escape.

Despite the growth of all denominations in recent years, 56 per cent of the State's population is still unaffiliated with any church.

The most pressing needs according to our Mission Director, Dr. E. L. Spivey, are:

1. Expanding our ministry with some 450,000 Military-related people of the Eastern North Carolina area, of whom approximately 10,000 are Japanese.
2. Church lot and Pastoral aid undergirding the 30,000 Movement.
3. Help to evangelize more than one million people who are the responsibility of Baptists.
4. Assist in developing 1,000 of our churches in their potential for greater Christian living and giving.

How may each member help in these worthy causes? "Let us pray for State Missions." Genuine concern on the part of Christians will lead to Prayer. Prayer will lead to Spiritual Victories. Your praying alone, or with your family, can be a missionary to North Carolina, which needs missionaries. Prayer can accomplish what offerings cannot. Offerings will accomplish little unless undergirded by prayer. Prayer will bless you and the causes, and the people for which you pray.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

The report on Home Missions, which was presented by Rev. J. I. McMahan, was adopted as follows:

Southern Baptist churches have given \$50,000.00 to be used in Convention-wide ministry of relief for the Latin American refugees in Florida — mostly from Cuba, as a part of the Annie Armstrong Home Mission offering.

The goal for establishment of 30,000 missions had reached the halfway mark January 1, 1962. Missions for language groups as a part of the 30,000 movement will be started.

The Brotherhood and Home Mission Board joined forces in sending men to pioneer areas for revivals and other witnessing in order to start missions. More than 500 men paid their own way, 1,500 are expected to respond in 1962. 600 student summer missionaries entered the 1962 effort in this movement.

The six Southern Baptist missionaries remained the largest United States mission force in Cuba. The Board allotted \$265,000.00 for this work which is still going strong despite the harrassment by the government.

The Home Mission budget for 1961 was \$4,425,000.00. The Cooperative Program receipts did not reach budget expectations, and the Board was not able to continue its "Big Cities" ministry, which had allotted \$100,000.00 each for church and mission sites in one of the nation's big cities.

The death of two secretaries reduced the Division of Chaplaincy to only the director, George W. Cummins. L. L. McGee was appointed to direct hospital chaplaincy effective June, 1962. 174 Southern Baptist chaplains serve in hospitals, and 174 in correctional institutes of the nation.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Rev. M. C. Swicegood presented the report on Foreign Missions, which was adopted as follows:

The rapid growth in worldwide population and the multiplying needs confronting mankind in this decade require a more fervent endeavor in mission advance than ever before.

The year just closing finds us with almost 1,600 missionaries under appointment for service in 47 different countries. Within the 117 years of the history of the Foreign Mission Board there have been approximately 2,850 missionaries appointed. More than half of this entire number are serving today in active service. There is another 183 emeritus missionaries who by their prayers and testimony reinforce the world task.

Within the scope of Foreign Missions a wide array of ministries are projected. Major emphasis, however, is placed on evangelism and church development. The objective of mission work is to bring people to personal faith in Christ and obedience to Him as Lord.

Each year the need for larger financial resources grows as an enlarging missionary effort presents inescapable needs. Therefore, the dedication of life must be matched with financial support. Our offerings will continue to provide growing resources as people respond to the call of God to give their lives in service throughout the world.

We not only urge our churches to increase their gifts through the Cooperative Program enabling our Foreign Mission Board to expand its services, but we plead with our churches to re-emphasize the Lottie Moon Christmas offering because this is the one offering that the entire amount goes to Foreign Mission work.

TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS REPORT

The report on Temperance and Public Morals, spoken to by Dr. D. P. McFarland, Secretary, Christian Action League, was adopted as follows:

Temperance and Public Morals is a definite concern of every Christian in this sinful world today. As we think about the low public morals of this day and age, surely we are accepting the challenge, which falls into our very laps, of praying for the people who have fallen into the ways of the devil. People who are disobedient to the Gospel of Christ, but yet they go on continually in the ways of wickedness separating themselves from the love of God.

There are approximately 68,000,000 American adults who drink alcoholic beverages to some degree. Think of the children and other innocent people who have to put up with these people in one way or another. No wonder our public moral standards are so low with this large number of people partaking of alcoholic beverages.

Alcohol is the cause of homes being broken up and children going hungry.

Crime is raging on every hand and the statistics prove that the biggest blame can be laid on alcoholic beverages.

Our highways are crowded today with people who are driving under the influence of alcohol. This causes many thousands of people to be killed and injured on our highways.

EVANGELISM REPORT

Rev. John Lucas presented the report on Evangelism which was spoken to by Dr. Frank K. Means, Secretary of Baptist Foreign Mission Board Latin American Work. The report was adopted as follows:

Someone has said, "Two things make our age unique. It is the age of total revolution, and it is the age of terrible urgency."

If it is a total revolution, then it means it will sweep the entire world in its onslaught. This certainly provokes a terrible urgency. This is not another crisis. This is a total revolution, and it can only be met with any degree of success with total dedication, on our part, to our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

The past is behind us and the future is before us. What can we do in a practical way to meet this present threat? Evangelism offers us a commendable contribution through our local church, our association, and our Convention.

Important meetings and programs:

Our associational clinic on evangelism will be held Monday, November 26, 1962 at the First Baptist Church, Forest City. All pastors and associational officers should attend, along with the teachers and officers of all church organizations.

Soul-Winning Commitment Day, January 6, 1963.

In January, it will be worthwhile to start your three months of cultivative witnessing, training our people to witness for Christ in preparation for our Baptist Jubilee Revivals in March and April.

February 11-13, 1963, State-wide Evangelistic Conference, Greensboro. Every church would do well to consider sending its pastor to this spiritually refreshing conference. Lay people should attend too.

February is transfer Church Membership Month. The non-resident church membership problem should have special attention at this time to be followed with perennial efforts.

March and April — Baptist Jubilee Revival Crusades. The date for the Baptist Jubilee Revival in our association is March 17-31, 1963.

July 2-4, 1963 Convention-wide Evangelistic Conference, Dallas, Texas.

March and April, 1964 World-wide Baptist Jubilee Revival. The date for our association is March 8-22, 1964.

Recommendations:

Constitution

Article I — Name

This body shall be known as the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

Article II — Membership

Sec. 1. The Association shall be composed of Baptist Churches of Rutherford County, Cleveland County and Polk County which are now members, and any other Baptist churches which may hereafter be admitted as provided.

Sec. 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented by her pastor and two representatives. Any church with more than fifty members shall be entitled to a messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. New churches may be admitted by a majority vote of messengers present after careful examination and found to be regular in their organization, orthodox in their doctrine, and supporting objects of the Association, State, and Southern Baptist Conventions. Churches are to be accepted under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year in order that the above may be determined.

Sec. 4. The Association may at any time dissolve connection with any church that becomes heterodox in doctrine or disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Sec. 5. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure.

Sec. 6. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming up to the Association, each claiming to represent the church; neither party shall be seated as messengers until the question is decided as to which party is the church in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of messengers present.

Article III — Objects

The objects of the Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence, and spiritual power of the churches and to direct, promote, and develop their energies in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the State Baptist Convention, and the Association itself.

Article IV — Meetings

Sec. 1. The Association shall meet in annual session on Tuesday and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October of each year. The Moderator shall call the body to meet in extra session if necessity shall arise.

Sec. 2. The Associational year shall begin October 1 of each year and close September 30 of the following year.

Article V — Officers and Duties

Sec. 1. The officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Librarian and leaders of the organized work in the Association, who shall be chosen annually by a majority present.

Sec. 2. The officers shall perform all duties usually devolving upon such officers in well deliberative assemblies.

Sec. 3. The term of Moderator shall not exceed more than two consecutive years.

Sec. 4. The Missionary of the Sandy Run Baptist Association shall work with and assist the churches and missions of the Association in the promotion of their work and shall be under the supervision of the Associational Board.

Article VI. — Associational Board

Sec. 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of the officers of the Association (Article V, Sec. 1) who shall also be the officers of this Board with the Moderator as chairman, the leader of each of the Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music), the Associational Missionary (ex-officio), the Chariman of Evangelism, the Associational Representatives on the Baptist State Convention General Board, each active pastor, and two members selected by each active church of the Association.

Sec. 2. This body shall act for the Association in the interium between annual sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, neither taking any action contary to the will of the Association, nor initiating any new policy or practice binding upon the Association unless specifically so directed. However, in an adequate emergency it may take such action at it may deem necessary, but such action so taken shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for its consideration.

Sec. 3. The Board shall be divided into committees with assigned duties (Article VII, Sec. 1).

Sec. 4. The Clerk will make a report to the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 5. This body shall meet on Monday following the first Sunday in each quarter. The place may be decided.

Article VII — Committees and Their Duties

Sec. 1. ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD COMMITTEES. The Associational Board shall be divided by the Committee on Committees into the following committees with their duties.

1. ADVISORY STEERING COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Associational Missionary, the leader of each Associational Organization (Pastor's Conference, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music), Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative of the Baptist State Convention General Board, the Chairman of the Associational Board Committee 2-7, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and Librarian. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

Minutes of the Sandy Run Baptist Association

(1) To study and act upon any matters of business of the Associational Board between quarterly meetings of the Board. Any Action taken shall be dependent upon the approval of the Associational Board.

(2) To counsel and advise any committee or church in the Association on any suggestion that may be submitted to it.

(3) To counsel, advise, and direct the Associational Missionary and recommend to the Associational Board any necessary changes in any phase of the work.

(4) To assist the Associational Missionary in his work and, in event of his resignation, this Committee shall be responsible for finding and recommending a successor to the Associational Board.

(5) To work with the Associational Missionary in formulating a calendar of activities for the Association.

2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. This committee and its chairman, consisting of nine members, shall be appointed by the Moderator of the Association soon following the annual session of the Association. It shall, as soon as possible, meet and assign the members of the Associational Board to the various committees, naming the chairman of each except as otherwise provided, and name the Standing Committees and their chairman (Article VII, Sec. 2). Also, it shall name any other committee assigned to it.

3. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM. This Committee shall be composed of the Associational Chairman of Evangelism and members assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings and organizations of the Association. It shall also encourage and help arrange revivals in every section of the Association and lead in simultaneous revivals. The chairmen will submit a written report to the annual session of the Association.

4. COMMITTEE ON ORDINATIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall serve in an advisory capacity when called upon to assist in the examination and ordination of deacons and candidates for the gospel ministry.

5. COMMITTEE ON LOCATION OF NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. Its duties shall be as follows:

(1) Receive and consider any request by any group for a mission to be organized into a Baptist church and recommend action to the Associational Board.

(2) Be alert to develop any lead that might be given toward the establishment of a new church or mission. Advise with the group, or groups, involved what steps should be taken in the location and or organization of a mission or church.

(3) Consider applications from any church or churches desiring membership in the Sandy Run Association and make recommendations to the Associational Board as to what action should be taken.

6. COMMITTEE ON FINANCES, BUDGET, AND AUDITING. This Committee shall be composed of the Treasurer as chairman, Moderator, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director W. M. U. President, Brotherhood President, Church Music Director, and as many

other members as the Committee on Committees may deem wise. This Committee shall prepare and recommend a budget for the Associational Program and suggest ways and means to the churches whereby the budget can be raised. It shall also be responsible for auditing the Treasurer's book.

7. COMMITTEE ON FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. The Committee on Committees shall appoint this Committee, naming the chairman, and assign as many members as it deems wise. It shall consider all church or mission requests for pastoral aid and requests to be made to the State or Home Mission Boards for aid or loans in buying church lots and shall make recommendations concerning them to the Associational Board.

8. COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS. This Committee and its chairman shall be named by the Committee on Committees. It shall bring a suitable report at the annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches to have died since the last annual session.

9. COMMITTEES TO REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL WORK. These are Committees on (1) State Missions, (2) Home Missions, (3) Foreign Missions, (4) Christian Literature, (5) Christian Education, (6) Children's Homes, (7) Homes for the Aging, (8) Baptist Hospital, (9) Annuity, (10) Temperance and Civic Righteousness, (11) Stewardship and (12) American Bible Society. These Committees and their chairmen, composed of not less than five members, shall be named by the Committee on Committees. Their duties shall be to inform our people about the work they are chosen to represent and lead in promoting it. The chairman of each Committee shall make a brief written report at the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 2. STANDING COMMITTEES. These Committees and their chairmen shall also be appointed by the Committee on Committees at the time of the Associational Board Committees are appointed, but they are not necessarily composed of Board members. They shall serve through the annual session of the Association. These Committees are:

1. TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of five members and shall report at the annual session. It shall state the time of the next annual meeting of the Association (Article IV, Sec. 1) recommend the place or places of the meeting and recommend the preacher and the alternate.

2. PROGRAM COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Associational Music Director, Associational Missionary, and host pastor or pastors. It shall prepare a printed program for the annual meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall in the opening of the annual meeting of the Association present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

3. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of five members. It shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of appreciation and any other resolutions it may deem expedient. Also, resolutions and recommendations presented at the annual session may be referred to this committee.

4. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall contact and nominate to the Associational Board in its July meeting for election all the leaders of Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music) so these leaders in turn can present their helpers to the Association in annual session for election. The Committee shall also contact and nominate at the annual session of the Association all Associational Officers, (Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Librarian) and the Chairman of Evangelism.

Article VIII — Trustees

Sec. 1. There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer.

Sec. 2. The Trustees and their chairman shall be appointed annually by the Committee on Committees at the time this Committee appoints the Associational Board Committees.

Sec. 3. Their duties shall be to hold title to property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association with the Association or Associational Board's fore-knowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution of the Association, and with State laws as they affect the Association.

Article IX

This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers in attendance, provided that notice is given and the proposed amendment is stated during the first day, but no vote shall be taken upon the proposed amendment until the afternoon session of the second day.

Rules of Order

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with song and prayer.

2. The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association. He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise provided for.

3. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be considered an authority in all cases not provided for in the Rules of Order: "but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the Presiding Officer may use his discretion subject to an appeal to the Association."

4. Brethren invited to sit with us shall have the liberty of discussion, but not of voting.

5. Speakers shall rise and address the Moderator, and shall confine themselves to the subject under discussion. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the Association.

6. No question shall be discussed without a motion thereon first being made and seconded. Motions made and seconded shall be stated by the Moderator previous to any discussion thereon. If motion contains two or more parts, it shall be divided at the request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote of the body.

Woman's Missionary Union of Sandy Run Association has certainly engaged in the retrospect phase of the Anniversary Year. We have paid tribute to our heritage, honored our early pioneer women by studying and protraying them. In January we had a special anniversary meeting using as our theme, "Diamonds for the King." Rev. Mike Lopez, mis-

sionary to the Spanish-speaking people in Santa Fe, New Mexico, came and spoke to us at that time.

Therefore, we would do well to carefully select that which we feed our minds.

One of the purposes of our State Convention, as stated in its constitution, is to distribute sound Christian literature. Since 1833 one means of carrying out that purpose has been the Biblical Recorder. This weekly

paper faithfully publishes news concerning the work of North Carolina Baptists, their ministry at home and around the world. It is important that we be informed properly and accurately. When people know the needs, they respond. The Recorder can be received into the homes of all our churches for only 4¢ per week per family.

For better than 76 years another publication of merit has been available to North Carolina Baptists. Charity and Children is printed on the campus of Mills Home in Thomasville and is closely identified with the child care ministry. However, attention is given to the full scope of news among Baptists in the state. Charity and Children costs sixty cents a year if sent to the church in bundle form. Individual subscriptions, sent weekly to each address, are \$1.00 a year.

There are many splendid magazines and papers published by the various Boards and Departments of the Southern Baptist Convention that should enter each Baptist home along with our own Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children.

To paraphrase an earlier quote, "not since the beginning of the Baptist witness in America has so much good literature been available for such a small investment." Let's read it!

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Rev. Harold DeLozier presented the report on the Baptist Children's Homes which was adopted as follows. The report was spoken to by Lloyd Pendergraft, Associate Editor of Charity and Children.

During the past year over 900 boys and girls received care through the Baptist Children's Homes. Many others have found other sources of care through efforts of the social service staff. More children were served by the Baptist Children's Homes last year than ever before in history.

Now completing the 78th year, the Baptist Children's Homes have given a loving home and Christian care to well over 8,000 children who early in life experienced the tragedy of loss of home and loved ones.

The Children's Homes include three institutions. Mills Home, Thomasville, founded by John H. Mills in 1885 as the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage, is the largest and is headquarters for the program.

The Home in Thomasville also includes a farm of 800 acres with a grade "A" dairy, Charity and Children print shop, the self supporting Mills Home Baptist Church and the administrative offices.

Kennedy Home near Kinston also has their own church on the campus. The 1,200 acre farm produces much of the food including beef and pork. Kennedy Home has cared for children since 1914.

Odum Home, Pembroke, has facilities for more than 24 Indian children. It is housed in a new building erected shortly after it came under the Baptist program of child care in 1958.

Well over 100 children are cared for in licensed Christian Foster Homes in all parts of North Carolina.

The Baptist Children's Homes receive support in a number of ways. Principal sources of income during the past 12 months were: The Co-operative Program, 33 per cent; The Thanksgiving Offering, 30 per cent; Once a Month Offering, 16 per cent; and All Other, 21 per cent.

May we all endeavor to do more for the children of North Carolina by supporting our Baptist Children's Homes.

Florence

On Sunday afternoon, April 9, 1922, a group of thirty-three Christian men and women, with zeal and vision, met at what was then known as the Welfare Building of the Florence Mill and organized the Florence Baptist Church. Rev. C. C. Matheny, whose love for the church and God's kingdom, was the guiding personality behind the movement, and he was called as the new church's first pastor.

Eventually the church felt that it was necessary to seek its own place of worship. The first house of worship was erected just south west of the Florence Mill on what is now called Powell Street. This was a framed structure which was soon expanded in order to meet the growing needs of the progressive church.

The Florence Church has been served by the following faithful and dedicated pastors: Rev. C. C. Matheny (1922-26); Rev. Z. D. Harrill (1927-28); Rev. L. N. Epley (1929-39); Rev. E. W. Bailes (1940-43); Rev. C. C. Matheny, for a second pastorate with Rev. Wilson W. Padgett as Associate Pastor (1944-45); Rev. Fred Dabney (1946-53); Rev. Fred A. Mauney (1953-60); and Rev. T. W. Estes (1961--).

The Florence Church grew with such rapidity that eventually more space was needed. To meet this growing need a new location was secured at the corner of South Broadway and Florence Streets. Here the present new and beautiful edifice was erected. The congregation entered this new building on Sunday, June 15, 1941 for the first service. Rev. E. W. Bailes led the church in the erection of this building. In April, 1947 a second unit of departments and Sunday School rooms was completed and first used in January, 1948. Another addition was entered and dedicated on April 13, 1958.

The next forward step by the church was to provide an adequate church staff. A modern parsonage was erected and a home for the Minister of Music was purchased. The combined value of these two homes is more than \$30,000.

With gratitude for the growth and accomplishments of the past, and with a responsible consciousness of the even greater possibilities of the future, the church continues to move forward in service to her Lord and to humanity.

Sandy Mush

Twelve years ago God put it in the minds and hearts of the people of the Sandy Mush area to organize a Baptist Church, which was soon realized.

During the twelve years that have passed there has been much progress both spiritually and materially.

The contributions have amounted to \$205,088.91, an average per year of \$17,090.74. 733 people have united with the Church. The present membership is 579.

With the population of the community on the increase, the church's membership surely will grow. During the past year there were 55 additions.

For all God's blessings upon the Sandy Mush Baptist Church, let us give humble thanks and continue as an Association to pray for them.

MUSIC MINISTRY REPORT

Malone Thomason presented the report on the Music Ministry, which was adopted as follows :

We are glad to report some very worthwhile activities. The Associational Family Singing School, October 29-30 and November 1-2, was a great success with 274 enrolled and an average attendance of 250.

On Monday night, December 17, at 7 o'clock we held a successful Associational Christmas Carol Sing on the Town Square of Forest City with near 250 present.

The Regional Choir Festival last March was held at the First Church, Spindale, with several choirs of our churches participating and doing their churches and our Association credit, all qualifying to participate in the State Festivals.

In addition, our organization sponsored music and singing at various meetings of the other organizations, especially Sunday School and Training Union meetings. We want to mention especially the singing at "M" Night and the Associational Evangelistic Conference.

Moreover, the Associational Music Officers met six times during the year in planning the various activities.

We welcome Edgar Lineberger into our association. Mr. Lineberger is Minister of Music and Education at Florence Church, Forest City.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

The report on the Brotherhood, which was adopted as follows, was presented by Hugh McBrayer.

The Brotherhood began in 1907 as the Layman's Missionary Movement with the purposes of bringing men face to face with their religious obligations, to enlist them in the affairs of Christ's kingdom, and to stimulate them to a greater consecration to God in worldwide evangelism. "It urged men to pray daily, study diligently, plan wisely, serve zealously, and give generously that the kingdom of Christ might prosper . . ."

The program of the Brotherhood in North Carolina is designed to develop a strong missionary movement of Baptist laymen. A definite

program of missionary education for men and boys is underway. Some of the Brotherhoods and R.A.'s are already engaged in the enlistment of men and boys who are on the church roll to witness to the lost, to give of their time, talent, and possessions through the church. Some Brotherhoods are working with the migrant farm laborers, men in prison, and men on probation. A few Brotherhoods are serving the deaf by seeing that the church provides a Sunday School class and worship opportunities for them.

Last year, several laymen from our State shared their witness on the missionary fields of Ohio, and J. David Taylor, president of the State Brotherhood Conference, participated in the New Life Movement in the Philippine Islands and in Japan. Next July laymen from our State will have opportunity to participate in Baptist Missions in North Dakota, Washington, Oregon, and California. So our laymen are slowly becoming informed about missions, some by actual experience.

In North Carolina, 1,450 Brotherhoods, with an enrollment of 35,000, and 2,000 R.A. Chapters, with an enrollment of 25,000, provide a vast reservoir of strength to be used for world evangelization. However, there are still about 200,000 men and an equal number of boys in the churches in our State who are not enlisted. This is a tragic fact and a tragic waste of manpower.

We are glad to report some very worthwhile activities in the Brotherhood work in our association.

The RA's under the leadership of our associational leader, Rev. Guy Johnson, have had a fine year. On last November 10 a R.A. Conclave was held at Forest City. That afternoon the boys met at the Elementary School Ball Park and were guided in age group playing under the direction of "Smoky" Burgess. This activity was followed with a "hot dog" supper in the school cafeteria. At the close of the meal, "Tuck" McConnell, noted ball player and Christian leader, spoke.

Our associational RA Camp was held at the South Mountain Baptist Camp (Region VIII Camp) on July 29 through August 1 with 144 boys and 13 counselors from our association in attendance. There were 36 rededications, 13 professions of faith, and two felt called into special Christian service.

The Associational Brotherhood held three very fine meetings the past year. The first one was at the Sandy Mush Church on the evening of March 11 with about 125 men in attendance. It was designed to promote the simultaneous revivals, being a fine testimonial meeting climaxed by a short message by Rev. Don Hill.

The second meeting was at the Adaville Church on April 19 just before World Missions Week. A fine message was delivered by Rev. John Lucas, promoting this week.

The third meeting was held with the Concord Church on September 9. The theme was stewardship. Some films on the subject were shown which was followed by some discussion.

The Associational Brotherhood sent lay speakers by request into eleven churches during the year. One Brotherhood and two RA Chapters were organized.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

Our Sunday Schools, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Unions and Brotherhoods are expressions of this conviction. Clinics, study courses and workshops are efforts in the same direction.

Our Christian colleges are evidence of our awareness that we as individual churches are not prepared to equip a person for the fullest life of service. In establishing these institutions of higher learning we are extending our efforts and pooling our resources to develop Christian leadership for our world. Apart from this function does the Christian church have any responsibility in the field of education?

North Carolina's seven colleges for generations have been supplying needed Christian leadership. Like the product of our churches, our colleges may fluctuate in direction, purpose and sense of mission. But through every crisis and every opportunity for growth in service, we should prayerfully support the administration and faculty of each school.

This year we salute Mars Hill College as it becomes a four year-degree-granting institution after a long and commendable history as a junior college. Now it shares to an even greater degree the needs of the other senior colleges in developing and retaining a faculty that will help it maintain its high standard.

What can you do to help your colleges become better ones?

1. Pray for them and their administrators by name.
2. Learn all you can about each of them.
3. Direct the most promising students to them.
4. Help others become interested in them, pointing out to those who can, how they can wisely invest in the future of Christian America through them.
5. Offer assistance (through one of the colleges) in making wills in their favor.

REPORT ON RETIREMENT PLANS

Rev. Charles McDaniel presented the report on Retirement Plans which was spoken to by Guy Cain, Secretary of Retirement Plans. The report was adopted.

More than 41 million dollars have been paid in relief and annuity benefits by the Annuity Board since its beginning in 1918. Last year these benefits totaled more than 3 million dollars and were paid to more than 4,500 ministers, denominational workers or their families, who were members of a retirement plan, and to approximately 750 on relief rolls.

As of April 1, 1963, there were 15,964, or 49% of the total churches in the Southern Baptist Convention participating in the Annuity Boards retirement program for their pastors. Out of a total of 212 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes and homes for the aged, 121 are enrolled in Annuity Board retirement plan with their employees. Total membership in the Board's retirement plan is approximately 25,000.

A special death benefit has been added to Southern Baptist protection plan. It covers both natural and accidental death. If a member dies of natural causes before the age of 40, the benefit provides a cash settlement to the member's widow or estate equal to the average salary on which dues were paid. If death is due to an accident, cash settlement

will be double the average salary. There is no added cost for this special death benefit, which is in addition to the regular retirement, widow and disability benefits of the protection plan.

Last year in our association we had 27 churches and 24 ministers participating. This year we have 29 churches participating.

HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

Rev. M. W. Stallings presented the report on Homes for the Aging, which was spoken to by Mrs. Gretchen Bowles, a resident of Hayes Home for the Aging. The report was adopted as follows:

God has blessed the ministry of our Homes for the Aging during the twelve years of operation. The past year has been filled with His goodness.

The Homes in Winston-Salem, Albemarle, and Hamilton now serve 160 residents. Yet, there are 160 more people waiting for admission. Homes such as Baptist Homes for the Aging are the only hope for a home in this world for many wonderful aging people. It will bless the heart of any person to visit the homes and see for themselves the radiant joy that this ministry is bringing to the residents.

The average age among the residents is 80, the youngest being 65 and the oldest 102, Each resident, in an atmosphere that is Christian, is surrounded by love, peace, and security. Each resident is assured of receiving tender loving care in sickness as well as in health. The residents testify of the blessings that come to them from the ties that exist between the homes and the Baptist people of North Carolina.

Baptists of North Carolina give financial support through two media. All churches are urged to make a special offering on the third Sunday

in February. The homes also receive 1.3 per cent of Cooperative Program funds, this being only \$7.92 out of every \$1,000.00 It is necessary that our special offerings be generous since the greater support comes by this means. Baptists are rendering a good ministry in this field of care for the aging, and are hoping to move forward in this area of concern for these people who have served in their day.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

The Stewardship Report, which was adopted as follows, was presented by Rev. Cecil Cothran.

Stewardship is every Christian's privilege. Many claim their love for God and His work but do not follow through in dedication. There is altogether too little response to the consecrated dollar ministry but far too few commit themselves in other areas of life. Yet, it is in the stewardship of the whole of life that abundant living comes. The richer and fuller life is available, but it is realized only when His plan and purpose is worked out in every department of our lives.

There has been a growing need for Christian Stewardship Development throughout our denomination, and especially in our smaller Southern Baptist churches. I am convinced that our need is met in the "Growth in Christian Stewardship" plan, made accessible by the Southern Baptist Stewardship Service, 127 Ninth Avenue, North, Nashville, Tennessee. This plan is designed to do two things: 1. Teach the meaning of Christian Stewardship and, 2. Encourage expression of Christian Stewardship.

The total receipts for this associational year were \$927,085. Sandy Run's constituency now totals 19,929. When our total dollars are figured in terms of average contributions per annum, only \$46.51 per person is given for all causes or phases of the work in our Lord's Kingdom. This reveals the urgent need for stressing Stewardship, for Jesus said, "where your treasure is, there will your heart be also."

Today Christian Stewardship in a material world should reflect a total life interest which must be centered in Christ and His redeeming love. Stewardship is never law's maximum but love's minimum.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The report on the American Bible Society was presented by Rev. Fred Bryant and was adopted as follows:

In 1962 important advances in Christian world missions were made by your American Bible Society. With the distribution of 31,523,455 volumes of scripture in 1962, scripture distribution rose to a new record.

Missions and churches abroad called upon the Bible Society for an increase of 48.3% in the number of Scripture volumes, a total of 17,032,704

copies in more than 100 countries in over 300 languages. The largest demands came from the rapid growing evangelical churches in Latin America, where the society circulated 10,666,710 Scripture volumes, a growth of 4,289,975 copies of the previous year.

Similar larger demands are coming from Asia and Africa. More than 10,000,000 volumes of Scripture rose 66% in 1962. Some parts of the Bible have now been translated into 401 African languages. There has been a large increase in society publications, including Bible, New Testament Gospel portions and Scripture selections for distribution overseas.

The Bible Society is busy at home. In our country one of every nine is a language person who does not know Christ as Saviour. One of each of the remaining eight is destitute or institutionalized, two of the remaining seven, profess no connection with any church.

The Society distributed more than 14,000,000 copies of the Scriptures in the United States in 1962 through institutions and missions.

The Bible Society provided the Armed Forces with 970,723 volumes of scripture free.

The Society made available to the blind 56,655 Braille volumes, and talking book records in more than 40 language systems.

The Society has translated and published some part of the Bible in 1,202 languages and dialects.

The churches contributed \$1,191,233.11 of the 2¾ billion spent by the Society, for this great work. We urge you to pray for and support this great work of spreading the gospel in the word of God which is so needful.

DEPARTMENT OF PROGRAM SERVICES REPORT

The following report on the Department of Program Services, which was presented by Rev. R. E. Thompson, was adopted:

The Department of Program Services promotes the total Baptist program through the associations and local churches. It is a department that is primarily public relations; and, it is incorporated in the Division of Stewardship Promotion and Editorial Services.

The work of the Department may be divided as follows:

I. AUDIO VISUAL AIDS

A. Film Library

The library has more than 2 200 35mm filmstrips and more than 100 16mm sound motion pictures available on a free rental basis for church use. A catalogue listing all titles with descriptions is available free upon request.

B. Film Production

The department continues to produce both 35mm and 16mm films in support of the total Baptist program for the departments of the Baptist State Convention.

C. Audio Visual Demonstration Conferences and Clinics

Each year the department, at the request of various associations, plans "one-night stand" demonstration conferences.

D. Audio Aids

More than 150 tape recordings, which is a 50% gain over last year, have been produced for the churches in the Convention this year.

II GRAPHIC ARTS

This service includes design and production of printed materials such as the Baptist Manual which is free upon request to all churches.

III. NEWS SERVICE

More than 75 special articles have been written and used extensively by all the news outlets of our state.

IV. TELEVISION AND RADIO

The department continues to produce the Baptist network series of television programs titled, "A Light Unto My Path." At present the department is producing a new series of taped Bible teaching programs with target date for airing in the spring of 1964.

V. OTHER AREAS

The department also shares in Schools of Missions. Other services are so many and varied that it would be impossible to list all areas in which the department is now serving. It is the earnest desire of the department to continue these services in every possible way.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

The report on the Baptist Hospital, which was spoken to by Dr. Benjamin Patrick, Associate Director of the Department of Pastoral Care, was presented by Rev. Charles Ginn. The report was adopted as follows:

The opportunity of serving persons created in the image of God is a high and holy privilege.

You and I have such an opportunity in multiplied thousands of people who are sick in body, mind and spirit, and who go to our Baptist Hospital seeking help. We reach out the hand of love and mercy through the skilled and dedicated hands of our doctors, nurses, chaplains, and many others involved in this ministry to the total person. We, as Baptists, are grateful for this opportunity of joining hands with those who give the miracle drug, guide the surgeon's knife, bring the message of hope, and do the hundreds of other tasks which are necessary in the operation of our great hospital.

The number of those who receive the services of our Hospital this year will be greater than the population of one of our medium-size North Carolina cities, such as Goldsboro or Salisbury. Most of them will be seriously ill and referred by their family physicians because they need the kind of care available only in a large medical center. They will go

from all areas of our state and from all walks and circumstances of life. What a privilege it is to serve these friends in need and what a challenge to our compassion!

The Mother's Day Fund, which we provide by our special offerings or by an item in our church budgets designated for the Hospital, is the means through which we make it possible for those who cannot pay to have the care they need. The \$176,000 which the Hospital receives from the Cooperative Program provided by our churches must go to help pay for buildings, purchase equipment, and support the Department of Pastoral Care.

I call attention to the Service Patient Endowment Fund of the Hospital which we may place in our wills for any amount, or contribute to at any time, and thus continue to be a part of this service of love through the years after we are gone.

I wish to thank our churches for their share in this ministry and call upon them to make their support a worthy expression of their Christian concern.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

Rev. Olen Kendrick presented the report on the Baptist Foundation, which was spoken to by Rev. J. D. Hillman, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Rutherfordton. The report was adopted.

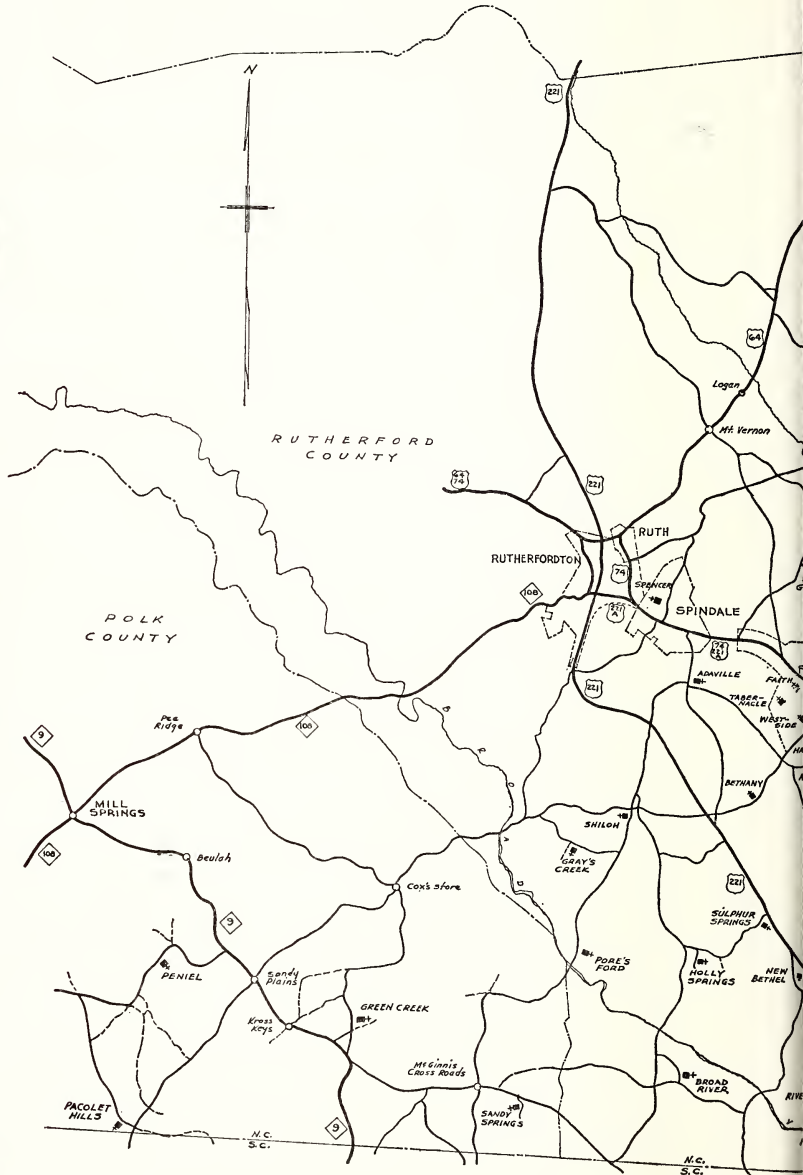
Since July, 1962, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation has established an office in the Baptist Building with a full-time Executive Secretary and secretarial help. This is the first time in the history of the Foundation that it has engaged in full-time emphases. The activities of the Executive Secretary have been varied. One of the purposes of the Board of Directors has been to carry the message of the services offered by the Foundation to as many associations as possible; into as many churches as possible; and to as many individuals as he has had the opportunity.

On June 30, 1962, we reported to you that the assets of the Foundation amounted to \$303,186.66. The assets of the Foundation as of June 30, 1963, were \$324,256.59. Since the close of business last year in June, 1962, the Foundation has technically in its control two estates of rather large size. The estate of R. Sterling Graves amount to approximately \$440,000. The estate of T. F. Pettus is in the neighborhood of \$110,000. Both of these estates are in the hands of the trustees of the estates and for all practical purposes they will be turned over to the Foundation in the very near future. These two estates will push our assets to over \$870,000. Those who have relatively small amounts of money, personal property or other real assets, will find the Foundation is just as anxious to serve them as it is to serve the larger estates. It is a fundamental belief of the Directors of the Foundation that the Foundation exists to serve all Baptists.

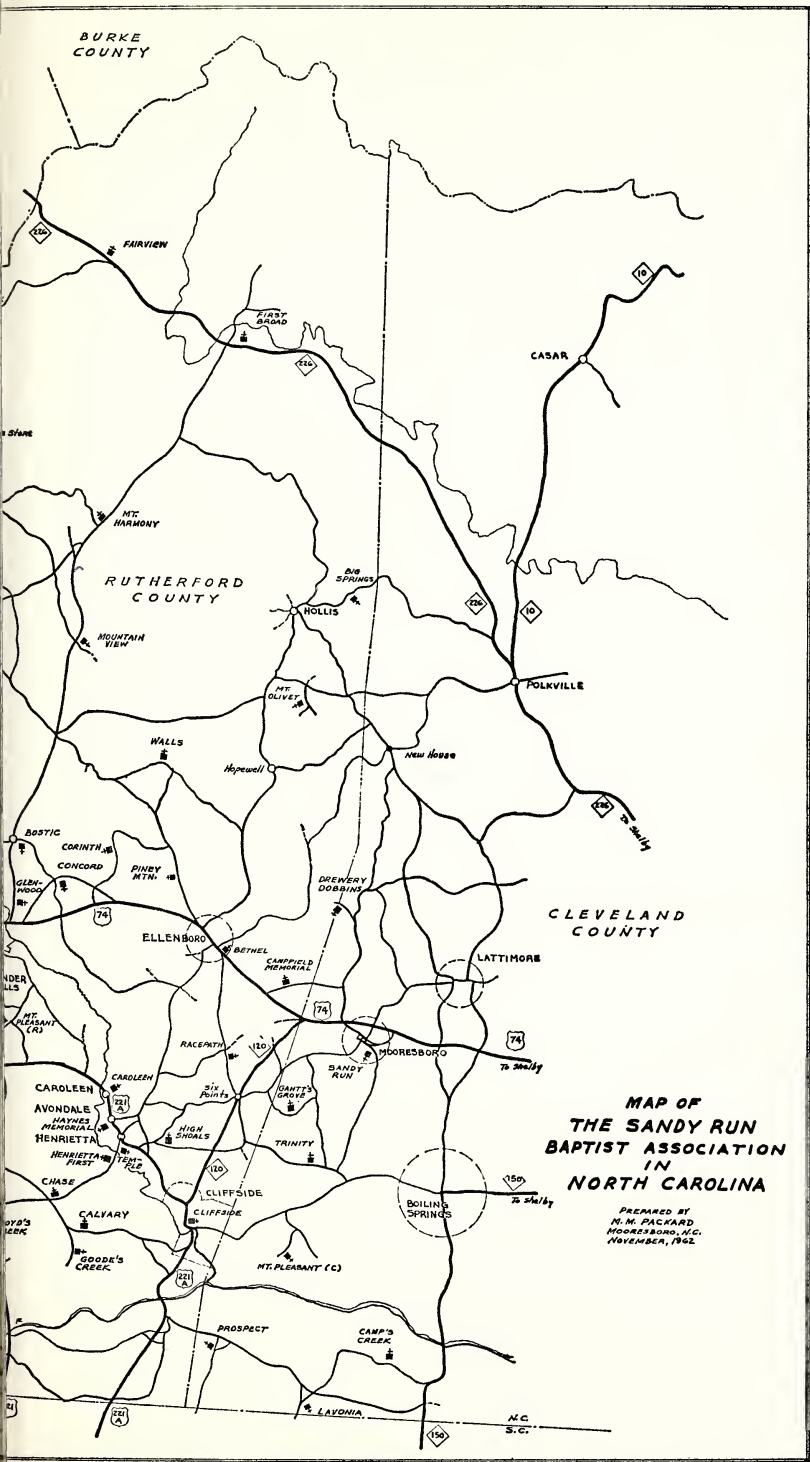

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT

W. V. Carroll presented the report on Associational Missions, which was adopted as follows:

It is a great privilege to work with the people and churches of our Sandy Run Association. The cordial welcome that the associational missionary receives in the churches is a heart warming experience. So how can he complain? Yet there are some things we ought to notice.

Our people and churches fail to see the missionary opportunities in our associational organizations to help others. Not all of our organizations are manned.

Many of our churches are prone to rock along in the same old way instead of studying and gaining a greater vision of our Lord's work. However, some are moving along, but consider our training awards. Only 22 of our 64 churches had training awards for the associational year through June.

Our people and churches could cooperate a lot better in associational projects, and they would be enriched. Let's show the greatest cooperation next spring in the Jubilee Revivals and next September in our Associational School of Missions.

Now, we almost forget all complaints when we think about the Associational Stewardship Development Program that we are in and that great Associational Leadership Supper held at the Chase High School! 43 of our churches were represented by 267 of our people! What a wonderful experience!

And what glowing reports are coming from the stewardship testimonies of our layman teams! It is wonderful!

During the year the missionary has visited in 125 services; delivered 377 sermons and addresses; taught 30 Sunday School lessons; presented 47 pictures; helped examine and ordain two preachers; helped in three Vacation Bible Schools; held and attended 180 individual conferences and committee meetings and numerous telephone conferences; conducted two VBS Clinics; attended 54 associational meetings and 21 conferences, workshops, and conventions outside the association, including a week at Gulfshore, Mississippi; published 10 issues of bulletins and mailed 7,507 copies and 14,151 letters and cards; and traveled 9,171 miles.

Please express your appreciation to Miss Martha Jean McFarland for the fine work she is doing. She is also responsible for these fine copies of Advance Reports.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

The report on State Missions, which was presented by Rev. J. R. Featherston, was adopted as follows:

North Carolina Baptists, for the most part have done well by special offerings for Home and Foreign Missions — and we are glad they have. It concerns us, however, that State Mission support has not kept pace with the expanding needs in our state.

It is not necessary to list the varied ministries of State Missions, but supplementary information helps to pinpoint some of the areas most in need. For example, 127 churches in 61 associations received \$91,000.00 last year on their Pastor's salary. New ministries such as the Seminary Extension Centers in the western section of the state are filling vital need. The Military population in the state, much larger than anyone thinks, is served in varied ways. An estimated 400 places in the state need new Baptist churches and missions. Most of these struggling congregations always ask aid in purchasing lots. The fact that the Cooperative Program provides only $\frac{1}{3}$ of the State Mission budget makes the success of this offering more urgent.

This year's emphasis is on Evangelism and a study of the decline in baptisms explains why. In 1954, there were 35,705 and 35,607 in 1955. In 1957 and 1958, the totals dropped to 33,798 and 34,836 respectively, but in 1959 the totals rose to 36,600. Since that year, however, the decline has been more evident. In 1960, there were 30,337 baptisms and in 1961 the total was 32,485. Last year's statistics showed another low of 30,881 with more than 500 churches reporting no baptisms. In the last decade while these figures have fluctuated, new churches have been organized and the state's population has grown several hundred thousands.

Of the 3,400 Baptist churches in the state today, more than 2,000 of them were aided in one way or another by State Missions in the early stages of their organization and growth. These include many of our largest, strongest churches as well as hundreds of smaller ones in rural and village areas. This is how strategic and far-reaching the State Mission ministry is today and has been for more than a century. No Baptist dollar has been spent more wisely than that which has gone into this work.

Dr. E. L. Spivey, director of the Division of Missions, is right when he says that, "Sometimes we are so busy looking at the world that we fail to see people right here in our own state." The test of Christianity, he continues, is not necessarily our love for missions in foreign lands but our love for people here and in distant countries.

By all means, Baptists should support Home and Foreign Missions, but let's not forget those who are our responsibility here in North Carolina.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

Rev. Raymond Crowe presented the report on Home Missions, which was adopted as follows:

The missionaries of the Home Mission Board are now serving in every state of the United States and in Cuba, Panama, and the Canal Zone. A survey is being made with regard to work in Puerto Rico, and the liaison ministry between Southern Baptist and Canadian Baptist is being continued.

At the close of 1962 the Board had 2,078 missionaries, a gain of 117 during the year. In addition, there were 595 students who served missions under the Board's direction. The percentage of workers serving in

pioneer areas and among the neglected people continues to increase. The total missionary force includes Administrative, Mission Pastors, Associational Missions, City Missions, Language Missions, National Baptists, and Pioneer Missions.

The Home Mission Board received during 1962: \$3,127,156.00 from the Cooperative Program; \$2,891,184.00 from the Annie Armstrong offerings; and \$194,408.00 from designations. Receipts from invested funds and rentals, exclusive of interest on church loans, amounted to \$152,800.00.

The Home Mission Board is cooperating with all of the states in support of mission work.

The amount provided in the 1963 budget to the work in North Carolina, which includes Associational Missions, City Missions and Mission Centers, Language Group Ministries, Survey and Special Studies, Work with National Baptists, Evangelism, and Student Ministries, totaled \$43,560.00.

Total appropriation through the Mission Division in 1963 budget provides 66.5 per cent for new areas and 33.5 per cent for 16 Southern States.

Plans have been made for the 1964 Jubilee Revivals. The Board is cooperating with the Brotherhood Commission in sponsoring the 1964 West Coast Laymen's Crusade in California, Washington, and Oregon. It is anticipated that 1,500 laymen will participate.

We have a challenge today. Never have Southern Baptists had a greater challenge for missions in the homeland than they have today. America cannot give to the world something which she does not have. Materialism, agnosticism, atheism, and indifference are taking a tremendous toll from the spiritual life of our nation. There is a great need for a spiritual awakening. The Home Mission Board wishes to make its total resources and personnel available to our Baptist constituency in helping to stimulate and inspire such an awakening.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

The Foreign Mission report was presented by Rev. Harvey Laughter and was adopted as follows:

How vast the world has grown since Jesus' day! It is estimated that the population of the world in the beginning of the first century totaled only 250 million people. Today there are more than 3 billion people in the world, and a recent report from the United Nations predicts that the population will double by AD 2000. The most optimistic estimate of the number of Christians in this vast population would place the number as less than one in three.

The growth of Christian missions is failing to keep step with the present population explosion. As a result, the world grows more pagan with every passing day. There are fewer Christians today, proportionately, than at the beginning of the Christian century.

Since Southern Baptists projected the Advance Program in foreign missions in 1948, great gains have resulted. Today, the Foreign Mission Board has approximately 1,800 missionaries—including missionary associates—under appointment to 53 countries.

To maintain this expanded world-wide program of missionary endeavor requires an expenditure of \$20,000,000 annually. Such funds must come from two sources: The Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Offering. The two sources are forever inseparable. They are the "Twin Streams" which make possible the foreign mission advance.

We can show our concern for foreign missions by continued prayer, increased support of the Cooperative Program, and with our gifts to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

The theme for 1963 has been "Sharing Christ with the Whole World." The time for self-examination has come. Do we really care for the multitudes of the earth? Are we actually concerned about sharing Christ with them?

ASSOCIATIONAL LIBRARY ORGANIZATION REPORT

The report on the Library Organization was presented by Mrs. Frank Willis and was adopted as follows:

The Associational Church Library Organization is a renewed effort on the part of the Southern Baptist Convention to aid churches in the many technical problems involved in establishing and maintaining a successful church library.

A check list of the 64 churches of the Sandy Run Association has been sent to me from Nashville.

42 churches reporting no library

1 church library reported but no librarian reported.

8 church libraries reported having received the Free Library Offer but have not received the Church Library Resource Guide (a \$4.95 book free for the asking) to assist in classifying books.

1 church library reported that has not received the Free Library Offer nor the Church Library Resource Guide.

On April 15 at Cliffside we had a meeting to assist churches in seeing the need for a church library and helping them to meet this need. As a result there were three new libraries started and two reactivated. There were 33 people present representing nine churches.

The New Testament church members gave much attention to reading the scriptures. The Reformation in Europe sprang from an emphasis on the necessity of every person's reading and interpreting the Bible for himself. Our Baptist forefathers, though often lacking in formal education, were great believers in Bible reading. Christ said, "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free." Today the search for truth and knowledge continues. The library service is a church's means of procuring materials, caring for them, encouraging their use, and circulating them to the people of the church.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE REPORT

The report on the Christian Action League, presented by Rev. Guy Johnson, was adopted as follows. The report was spoken to by Rev. W. P. Biggerstaff.

The world-renowned Dr. Albert Schweitzer has said, "Drink is commercially our greatest wastrel, socially our greatest criminal, and morally and religiously our greatest enemy." This is true today.

It is estimated that in the year 1962, there were 68,000,000 American adults who drank alcoholic beverages in some degree. Of these, 5,400,000 were alcoholics and another 4,100,000 were heavy drinkers or problem drinkers (pre-alcoholics). Take into account that for each one of these 9,500,000 there are five additional people whose lives are adversely affected by their drinking. Alcohol is a potent factor in the destruction of many homes, and its victims fill our prisons. It is a major contributor to the crime rate in our land which is at an all-time high and is increasing annually.

But the story does not end here. Alcohol is writing a very shameful and bloody record on the highways of our land. In 1962 there were: 40,500 deaths on the highways (2,900 more than 1961) and 3,345,000 injuries on the highways (228,000 more than 1961).

Some estimates go as high as 75% in the relation of alcohol to these accidents. The Highway Patrol says that alcohol was a factor in more than 50% of the fatal accidents on North Carolina highways last year.

The Christian Action League is an organization of the evangelical denominations of North Carolina for action in areas of common concern in the moral issues of the day. An Executive Director is employed for full-time service in promoting the work of the organization. The financial support of the League comes from donations by the affiliated denominations, from churches and from individuals who are concerned.

The Christian Action League seeks (a) to unite all who believe in total abstinence from alcoholic beverages to a cooperative effort to agitate, legislate and educate against this social evil; (b) to awaken public interest in opposing gambling, narcotic addiction, salacious literature

and acts of vandalism; (c) to promote programs for the rehabilitation of the victims of alcoholic beverages and other narcotics.

The Camp is growing and has had its finest summer this past summer. Counting the staff of 17 each week, there were 1,360 who attended.

There were both G.A. and R.A. Camps held. The total attendance by associations was as follows: Catawba River — 298, Gaston — 263, Green River — 90, Kings Mountain — 164, Sandy Run — 158, South Fork — 47, South Yadkin — 97, South Mountain — 66, Theron Rankin — 53, and the camp for the deaf — 67.

667 made various decisions for Christ. 102 boys and girls accepted Christ as their Saviour.

Five R.A. and five G.A. camps are being planned for next summer with an expected attendance of 1,800.

It is hoped that the Sandy Run Association will do something for this camp financially.

Constitution

Article I — Name

This body shall be known as the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

Article II — Membership

Sec. 1. The Association shall be composed of Baptist Churches of Rutherford County, Cleveland County and Polk County which are now members, and any other Baptist churches which may hereafter be admitted as provided.

Sec. 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented by her pastor and two representatives. Any church with more than fifty members shall be entitled to a messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. New churches may be admitted by a majority vote of messengers present after careful examination and found to be regular in their organization, orthodox in their doctrine, and supporting objects of the Association, State, and Southern Baptist Conventions. Churches are to be accepted under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year in order that the above may be determined.

Sec. 4. The Association may at any time dissolve connection with any church that becomes heterodox in doctrine or disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Sec. 5. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure.

Sec. 6. In case of internal dissention in a church and two parties coming up to the Association, each claiming to represent the church; neither party shall be seated as messengers until the question is decided as to which party is the church in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of messengers present.

Article III — Objects

The objects of the Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence, and spiritual power of the churches and to direct, promote, and develop their energies in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the State Baptist Convention, and the Association itself.

Article IV — Meetings

Sec. 1. The Association shall meet in annual session on Tuesday and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October of each year. The Moderator shall call the body to meet in extra session if necessity shall arise.

Sec. 2. The Associational year shall begin October 1 of each year and close September 30 of the following year.

Article V — Officers and Duties

Sec. 1. The officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Librarian and leaders of the organized work in the Association, who shall be chosen annually by a majority present.

Sec. 2. The officers shall perform all duties usually devolving upon such officers in well deliberative assemblies.

Sec. 3. The term of Moderator shall not exceed more than two consecutive years.

Sec. 4. The Missionary of the Sandy Run Baptist Association shall work with and assist the churches and missions of the Association in the promotion of their work and shall be under the supervision of the Associational Board.

Article VI — Associational Board

Sec. 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of the officers of the Association (Article V, Sec. 1) who shall also be the officers of this Board with the Moderator as chairman, the leader of each of the Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music Library), the Associational Missionary (ex-officio), the Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representatives on the Baptist State Convention General Board, each active pastor, and two members selected by each active church of the Association.

Sec. 2. This body shall act for the Association in the interim between annual sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, neither taking any action contrary to the will of the Association, nor initiating any new policy or practice binding upon the Association unless specifically so directed. However, in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action so taken shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for its consideration.

Sec. 3. The Board shall be divided into committees with assigned duties (Article VII, Sec. 1).

Sec. 4. The Clerk will make a report to the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 5. This body shall meet on Monday following the first Sunday in each quarter. The place may be decided.

Article VII — Committees and Their Duties

Sec. 1. ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD COMMITTEES. The Associational Board, shall be divided by the Committee on Committees into the following committees with their duties.

1. ADVISORY STEERING COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Associational Missionary, the leader of each Associational Organization (Pastor's Conference, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music), Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative of the Baptist State Convention General Board, the Chairman of the Associational Board Committee 2-7, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and Librarian. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

(1) To study and act upon any matters of business of the Associational Board between quarterly meetings of the Board. Any action taken shall be dependent upon the approval of the Associational Board.

(2) To counsel and advise any committee or church in the Association on any suggestion that may be submitted to it.

(3) To counsel, advise, and direct the Associational Missionary and recommend to the Associational Board any necessary change in any phase of the work.

(4) To assist the Associational Missionary in his work and, in event of his resignation, this Committee shall be responsible for finding and recommending a successor to the Associational Board.

(5) To work with the Associational Missionary in formulating a calendar of activities for the Association.

2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. This committee and its chairman, consisting of nine members, shall be appointed by the Moderator of the Association soon following the annual session of the Association. It shall, as soon as possible, meet and assign the members of the Associational Board to the various committees, naming the chairman of each except as otherwise provided, and name the Standing Committees and their chairman (Article VII, Sec. 2). Also, it shall name any other committee assigned to it.

3. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM. This committee shall be composed of the Associational Chairman of Evangelism and members assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings and organizations of the Association. It shall also encourage and help arrange revivals in every section of the Association and lead in simultaneous revivals. The chairman will submit a written report to the annual session of the Association.

4. COMMITTEE ON ORDINANCES. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall serve in an advisory capacity when called upon to assist in the examination and ordination of deacons and candidates for the gospel ministry.

5. COMMITTEE ON LOCATION OF NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. Its duties shall be as follows:

(1) Receive and consider any request by any group for a mission to be organized into a Baptist church and recommend action to the Associational Board.

(2) Be alert to develop any lead that might be given toward the establishment of a new church or mission. Advise with the group, or groups, involved what steps should be taken in the location and/or organization of a mission or church.

(3) Consider applications from any church or churches desiring membership in the Sandy Run Association and make recommendations to the Associational Board as to what action should be taken.

6. COMMITTEE ON FINANCES, BUDGET, AND AUDITING. This Committee shall be composed of the Treasurer as chairman, Moderator, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, W. M. U. President, Brotherhood President, Church Music Director, and as many

other members as the Committee of Committees may deem wise. This Committee shall prepare and recommend a budget for the Associational Program and suggest ways and means to the churches whereby the budget can be raised. It shall be responsible for auditing the Treasurer's book.

7. COMMITTEE ON FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. The Committee on Committees, shall appoint this Committee, naming the chairman, and assign as many members as it deems wise. It shall consider all church or mission requests for pastoral aid and requests to be made to the State or Home Mission Boards for aid or loans in buying church lots and shall make recommendations concerning them to the Associational Board.

8. COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS. This Committee and its chairman shall be named by the Committee on Committees. It shall bring a suitable report at the annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches to have died since the last annual session.

9. COMMITTEES TO REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL WORK. These are Committees on (1) State Missions, (2) Home Missions, (3) Foreign Missions, (4) Christian Literature, (5) Christian Education, (6) Children's Homes, (7) Homes for the Aging, (8) Baptist Hospital, (9) Annuity, (10) Temperance and Civic Righteousness, (11) Stewardship, (12) American Bible Society, (13) Christian Life, and (14) Baptist Foundation. These Committees and their chairman, composed of not less than five members, shall be named by the Committee on Committees. Their duties shall be to inform our people about the work they are chosen to represent and lead in promoting it. The chairman of each Committee shall make a brief written report at the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 2. STANDING COMMITTEES. These Committees and their chairman shall also be appointed by the Committee on Committees, at the time the Associational Board Committees are appointed, but they are not necessarily composed of Board members. They shall serve through the annual session of the Association. These Committees are:

1. TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of five members and shall report at the annual session. It shall state the time of the next annual meeting of the Association (Article IV, Sec. 1), recommend the place or places of the meeting and recommend the preacher and the alternate.

2. PROGRAM COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Associational Music Director, Associational Missionary, and host pastor or pastors. It shall prepare a printed program for the annual meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program, and to all pastors, at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall, in the opening of the annual meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

3. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of application and any other resolution it may deem expedient. Also, resolutions and recommendations presented at the annual session may be referred to this committee.

4. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall contact and nominate to the Associational Board in its July meeting for election all the leaders of Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music Library), so these leaders in turn can present their helpers to the Association in annual session for election. The Committee shall also contact and nominate at the annual session of the Association all Associational Officers, (Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Librarian) and the Chairman of Evangelism.

Article VIII — Trustees

Sec. 1. There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer.

Sec. 2. The Trustees and their chairman shall be appointed annually by the Committee on Committees at the time this Committee appoints the Associational Board Committees.

Sec. 3. Their duties shall be to hold title to property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association with the Association or Associational Board's free knowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution of the Association, and with State laws as they affect the Association.

Article IX

This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers in attendance, provided that notice is given and the proposed amendment is stated during the first day, but no vote shall be taken upon the proposed amendment until the afternoon session of the second day.

Rules of Order

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with song and prayer.
2. The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association. He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise provided for.
3. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be considered an authority in all cases not provided for in the Rules Of Order.: "but in cases where the meaning may not be clear, the Presiding Officer may use his discretion subject to an appeal to the Association."
4. Brethren invited to sit with us shall have the liberty of discussion, but not of voting.
5. Speakers shall rise and address the Moderator, and shall confine themselves to the subject under discussion. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the Association.
6. No question shall be discussed without a motion thereon first being made and seconded. Motions made and seconded shall be stated by the Moderator previous to any discussion thereon. If motion contains two or more parts, it shall be divided at the request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote of the body.

ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD REPORT

The report of the Associational Board was presented by Miss Martha Jean McFarland and was adopted as follows:

On November 4, the Committee on Committees, having divided the Board members into the various committees, presented its report which was adopted. A motion passed that the Moderator appoint a committee of three to study the Constitution in regard to bringing it up to date.

On January 20, the reports from the various organizations were heard. The treasurer's report was presented and churches that had not sent in a contribution were urged to do so.

On April 6, upon a recommendation from the Steering Committee, the following were elected to serve as the Schools of Missions Directing Committee: Rev. T. W. Estes, Chairman; John Lucas, Sam Jenkins, Z. W. Jolley, Mrs. J. E. Cargill, Hugh McBrayer, Mrs. Lorena Hicks, and P. B. Price. A motion carried that the financial books be closed as of September 30 each year and that all contributions to associational missions made after that date be counted as receipts in the next year.

On July 6, the following report from the Nominating Committee was adopted: S. S. Superintendent, Audley Hamrick; T. U. Director, R. E.

Thompson; Brotherhood President, Sam Hargett; W. M. U. President, Mrs. James Marchman; Librarian, Mrs. Frank Willis; and Music director, Edgar Lineberger.

The report of the Committee on Constitutional Changes was presented and a motion carried that the Associational Board recommend to the Annual Session the following changes in our constitution:

(1) That the Library Organization be added to the organization listed in Article VI, Section 1.

(2) That we include the Christian Life and Baptist Foundation Committees in Item 9, Section 1 of Article VII.

(3) That the Library Organization be included in Article VII, Section 2, and item 4.

On October 4, the various organizations reported on their work. Rev. T. W. Estes, Director of the Schools of Missions, gave a report on the Schools of Missions as follows: 27 churches participated with an average attendance the first week of 962 and an average attendance the second week of 1,117.

We are aware of the fact that services rendered by the ministries of the Convention staff and departments such as Sunday School, Training Union, Evangelism, Music, Brotherhood, Fruitland Institute, Surveys, Schools of Missions, etc. When the association or churches use these services, it represents many thousands of dollars which are not put on a record book.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

The following report on Stewardship was adopted:

The Cooperative Program helps us to meet a total world missions task. Through this means our churches are able to present a united front and to develop a unified approach.

Since 1925 the Cooperative Program has been the channel enabling North Carolina Baptists to support the world ministry committed to them by Christ in the Great Commission.

Your church has a part in the support of over 5,000 missionaries who baptized over 58,000 people last year if you give through the Cooperative Program.

In addition to these missionaries, we help 63 Baptist Hospitals, 45 orphanages, 14 homes for aging and 1,132 schools around the world as we give through the Cooperative Program.

The individual Christian worships with tithes and Offerings in his local church. The church plans a budget and decides what portion shall be given to all denominational causes through the Cooperative Program.

Contributions from the churches through the Cooperative Program for all causes are sent to the Convention office in Raleigh. Cooperative Program gifts are then divided between all missions, Christian Education, and Social Service work of Southern Baptists. Each Baptist hospital, children's home, school, home for aging, and each area of general mission work receives a part of the Cooperative Program dollar.

The sun never sets on the work of our Cooperative Program.

By decision of the Special Convention in Greensboro, our churches are urged to increase their giving through the Cooperative Program by at least 35%. Receipts beyond the basic budget for this year make up an advanced section of the Cooperative Program and is allocated for expansion and capital improvement in the program of Higher Christian Education, through our seven Baptist colleges (85¢ for colleges, 15% for student centers.)

Our people are giving approximately one third of the tithe into their churches. The churches give an average of a little more than eight cents of each dollar of church income through the Cooperative Program to witness to two billion lost people in the world.

During the past associational year 53 churches in Sandy Run Association gave a total of \$85,221.00 through the Cooperative Program. Eleven churches, according to available records, did not contribute to the World Program of Jesus through the Cooperative Program.

This in part is the suggested report on stewardship from our Baptist leaders in Raleigh.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The Historian's Report, which was presented by Cecil Cothran, was adopted.

The brief progressive history of our Associational churches is listed under four primary headings: Construction, Improvements, Pastoral Changes, and Ministers of Music.

I. CONSTRUCTION:

Campfield Memorial's auditorium will be completed in approximately two weeks.

New Bethel held its dedication service on May 24, 1964.

The new \$270,000 Educational Plant is 40% complete at the **Spencer Baptist Church**.

II. IMPROVEMENTS:

The following improvements are reported:

Adaville painted the interior of the church, purchased choir robes, and installed hearing aids on pews in the Sanctuary. **Bethany** has erected an outside Bulletin Board. **Bethel** has painted the interior of their Educational Plant, added air conditioning, and paid off their building debt. **Big Springs** has paid off their building debt and had Dedication Service. This church also did interior painting and landscaped for Recreation. **Cane Creek** reshingled church building and purchased new pulpit furniture. **Concord** paved driveway and parking areas, remodeled the parsonage, and developed cemetery grounds. **Corinth** wrecked old church building and erected a new Bulletin Board. **Drewery Dobbins** built a new fellowship hall this year. **First Broad** recently purchased a new piano. **Floyd's Creek** purchased new Baptist Hymnals. **Crestview** completed one wing of the educational plant. **Florence Church** has added air conditioning to entire church and painted the interior of the building. They also paved parking lots. **Harmon Street** painted building, added nursery, and erected outside bulletin board. **Gantt's Grove** has added new heating system and landscaped grounds. **Glenwood** purchased 15 acres of land for a building site. Also organized a Young People's Department in Sunday School. **Goode's Creek** has purchased a Hammond Organ and graded and sowed cemetery grounds. **Harris, First** reroofed church building, painted exterior, and repaired overhead of inside of building. **Henrietta First** has added a bathroom to first floor of the par-

sonage and painted throughout. **High Shoals** painted the Sunday School classrooms and carpeted one classroom. **Mt. Harmony** added new windows to church and placed new church sign at front of church. **Mt. Lebanon** has renovated their building, carpeted floors, and painted. **Mountain View** painted educational plant and repaired roof of the church. **New Bethel** paid off their indebtedness. **Piney Mountain** installed rest rooms. **Pore's Ford** landscaped church grounds, painted inside building and added new pews. **Race Path** purchased $\frac{1}{4}$ acre of land. **Shiloh** paid off their indebtedness, reroofed the church building, landscaped grounds, placed tile on floors in two classrooms and installed a Chime system. **Temple** remodeled kitchen, installed air conditioning and a new heating system. **Wilson** painted the exterior of their building.

III. PASTORAL CHANGES:

During the year the following men have become pastors of the churches indicated: M. W. Stallings — **Henrietta First**; Tyler LeRoy — **Bostic First**; Floyd Seay — **First Broad**; T. Earle Poole — **Sandy Mush**; Johnny Bridges — **Faith**; Bill Holland — **Campfield Memorial**; Raymond Hudson — **Temple**.

IV. MINISTERS OF MUSIC:

The following churches have added the below mentioned Music Directors to their staff: **Adaville** — Jack Jenkins; **Concord** — W. C. Giles; **Cliffside** — Jerry Mashburn (Interim); **Forest City First** — Miss Josephine D'Arpa.

Brief histories of the host churches as prepared by the Historian.

First Baptist Church

Cool Springs Church, as the First Baptist Church was originally known, was organized in December, 1848, with seventeen charter members coming largely from the Bostic, Doggett, Goode, Hardin, Harrill, and Rogers families. The church derived the name Cool Springs from the springs nearby bearing that name.

The present church building is the fourth to be erected during the history of the church. The first church, built of logs, was located north of the present Cool Springs Cemetery. A second church was built in 1867 following the construction of a railroad through the church property. This building was erected on the south side of the railroad near the present elementary school building. It was used until 1889, when a brick church was constructed at the corner of West Main and Church Streets.

In the church records of February 22, 1889, the following entry is found: "Motion to move into new church house in Forest City. Motion carried." It was at this time that the name of the church was changed from Cool Springs to Forest City.

Construction of the present church building began in 1913, and on February 21, 1915, the congregation met in the new church for the first time.

The next building program inaugurated by the church was the construction of the pastor's home in 1923. This was followed by the erection of an educational building in 1926. This building, named the "Alexander Memorial Building," in memory of Mr. J. F. Alexander, was first occupied in March, 1927.

Growth and development in the intervening years created a need for more educational space and in 1957, during the ministry of Dr. H. Hansel Stembridge, Jr., a chapel and several more classrooms were added on to the sanctuary building.

Down through the years the church has realized the importance of missions, and as a result, approximately 48% of the budget this year will be invested in mission causes. And following the tradition of her 116 year history, the more than 900 members of First Baptist Church look to the future in Christ as they continue their ministry to Forest City and the world at large.

Mt. Pleasant (C) Baptist Church

Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church had a rather unusual beginning. It had its start in the minds of three men who were unsaved but yet felt a need for a Sunday School for their children. One of the men agreed to give both land and timber for the erection of a church building. When the promised building was completed in December of 1848, Elder Thomas Dixon held a revival meeting. From that meeting came plans for the organization of a Baptist Church. A few weeks later, on January 9, 1849, the new church was constituted with 21 charter members.

From that log building, built in 1848, the church has moved to two other buildings near the original location. The present structure was erected near the turn of the century and has been enlarged and remodeled several times. An educational plant was built in 1954 with a capacity for teaching over 250. The auditorium was completely remodeled in 1960. A home for the pastor was built in 1959 bringing the total church property to be valued at over \$200,000, although built for much less.

The church has long cooperated with the Sandy Run Association, being one of the original churches forming the association. Mt. Pleasant has been host to the annual meeting of the association on five occasions, the last being in 1964.

The Sunday School is fully graded, as is the Training Union. An active W. M. U. and Brotherhood leads the church in a program of mission education. The resident membership is now 225, with a Sunday School enrollment of 226.

Since there are two churches in the Sandy Run Association named Mt. Pleasant, they are distinguished by the use of the letters "C" and "R" which show the county in which the respective churches are located, Cleveland and Rutherford.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The following report on the Sunday School was adopted:

The Associational Sunday School work has been good during the past year. All phases of the work have been carried out. But there is a need for a greater effort on the part of our Association, every Sunday School and every individual as we face the challenge of the new year.

The Sunday Schools of our churches have been assigned the tasks of outreach, teaching the Bible, leading all church members to worship and witness daily, providing opportunities to perform the personal

ministries of the church, furnishing workers for various projects, and interpreting the work of the church and denomination.

Dr. A. V. Washburn, secretary of our Southern Baptist Sunday Schools, says, "Before outreach can become a continuing reality, our churches must get their programs in the right order. The natural order is the reaching of people, the winning of the lost, and the development that should come out of it."

Southern Baptist Sunday Schools are seeking to enroll ten million by 1970. In order to achieve this goal we must gain approximately 30% in the next six years. Our part in North Carolina is to enroll one million by 1970.

We are asking each Sunday School in our association to accept an enrollment increase of 2% for 1965, 3% for 1966, 4% for 1967, 5% for 1968, 6% for 1969, and 7% for 1970. Evangelism, stewardship, missions, discipleship — all of these wait upon outreach.

Also, each Sunday School is urged to observe January Week of Bible Study, plan a Vacation Bible School, promote Operation Home Study and other opportunities of training, cooperate in the Adult Thrust, to participate in the associational Sunday School projects, and to encourage workers to attend the Sunday School emphases at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly, Fruitland, and Ridgecrest. As our Sunday Schools go, so will our churches go.

"M" Night at Spencer Baptist Church on December 2, 1963, gave inspiration for our year. Rev. Tom S. Lawrence, First Baptist Church, Union, S. C. brought the message. The attendance was 515 with 25 churches and 23 pastors participating.

Youth Night at Race Path Baptist Church, was led by Kenny Morrison. The message was by Rev. Don Moore of Gardner-Webb College, and music by the Youth Choir of the Cliffside Baptist Church. 114 attended from 15 of our churches, with Cliffside having 19. Seven pastors were present.

The Associational Training Union Tournament this year had one church, Mt. Pleasant (C), having someone in each tournament. Other churches entering were, Adaville, Drewery Dobbins, Sandy Run, Race Path, Spencer, Caroleen, and Floyd's Creek. A special effort should be made for each church to participate in the tournament next year.

Sulphur Springs was host at our September 7 meeting. Rev. T. W. Estes was our inspirational speaker.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

After the adoption of the following report on the Woman's Missionary Union presented by Mrs. J. E. Cargill, our Associational Missionary and his wife were honored and presented with a gift.

The Jubilee Year has suggested to W. M. U. members that we "Hold high the Torch," **For Liberty and Light**. These three major points we have emphasized: Aim to Advance, Celebrate the Jubilee and Present Post-Jubilee Program.

Annual reports have not come in to tell just how far we have advanced in the work. However, we can report advancement in mission study and reading mission books, increase in gifts to special offerings and more prayer retreats have been held and associational officers held one in September.

Reading the New Testament, has been one phase of Jubilee celebration. Societies have had celebrations in their churches and honored their pastors. We had delegates to the State W. M. U. Convention in Durham, and several ladies attended the Jubilee Convention in Atlantic City.

The Post-Jubilee Program of the Southern Baptist Convention has been presented. The ladies were well represented at the regional meetings held for the promotion of this program.

Leaders have availed themselves of several opportunities for better training. About ninety W. M. S., Y. W. A. and Sunbeam leaders received Cards of Accreditation from a Leadership Training Course last November. Ridgecrest and Fruitland have been well attended. Two associational officers were at the Interracial Institute in Charlotte last fall, and received help in dealing with the current racial situation.

At the printing of this report, the Y. W. A. report had not been received.

The G. A. report is good. On April 6, an Intermediate G. A. Banquet was held at First Church, Forest City. Mrs. Zeb Moss spoke to 135 girls and their leaders from 14 churches. A Junior G. A. picnic was held at Race Path, May 9. The theme for this meeting was, "His Way, Mine., Twenty-three churches were represented with an attendance of 270. We have 73 organizations in 37 churches — 30 of these attained recognitions on Aims for Advancement. Twenty-seven of our churches have no G. A. work.

The Sunbeam work has been carried on by local leadership, no associational director.

Five years and two months as Associational President of W. M. U. have ended my service in this capacity. I express sincere gratitude for your every gesture of kindness and support, your prayers, cooperation and encouragement. These parting words I leave as a challenge to you, "Look on our Associational field, for truly they present a tremendous and bounteous harvest for us."

MUSIC MINISTRY REPORT

The following report on the Music Ministry, which was presented by Malone Thomason, was adopted:

We are happy to report the largest attendance in our associational music schools that has ever been recorded. We had two weeks of schools the third and fourth weeks in July. The third week we had six group schools with 31 of our churches participating and 8 churches outside our association.

The fourth week we had a central school at the First Baptist Church, Forest City, with 24 churches of our association participating and six churches outside.

The group school enrollment was 392, and the central school enrollment was 99, making a total of 491, enrolled. A total of 48 churches participated in the schools, 36 in our association and 12 outside. 20 of our churches participating in both weeks of schools.

On Monday night, December 16, at 7 o'clock, we held a successful Associational Christmas Carol Sing on the Town Square of Forest City with near 300 present.

The regional Choir Festival last March was held at the Elizabeth Church, Shelby, with several choirs of our churches participating and doing their churches and our Association credit, all qualifying to participate in the State Festivals.

In addition, our organization sponsored music and singing at various meetings of the other organizations, especially Sunday School and Training Union meetings. We want to mention especially the singing at "M" Night and the Associational Evangelistic Conference at the First Church, Forest City.

Moreover, the Associational Music Officers met six times during the year in planning the various activities.

We welcome Miss Josephine D'Arpa and Mr. W. C. Giles into our Association. Miss D'Arpa is Minister of Music at the First Church, Forest City, and Mr. Giles is Minister of Music at the Concord Baptist Church.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

The Brotherhood report, presented by Bill Holland in the absence of Hugh McBrayer, was adopted as follows:

There is a new concept of the Brotherhood as follows: "A Brotherhood is a fellowship of Baptist men, members of the church, organized to advance the cause of Christ through a program of missionary activities, designed to inform, motivate and involve men in the mission task of their church."

The Brotherhood is the only organization in the church with a program of missionary education and promotion that involves men and boys.

The new and well defined objectives of this organization are as follows:

1. A deeper commitment to missions
2. A more meaningful prayer life for missions
3. A larger stewardship on behalf of missions
4. A personal involvement in missions

The organizational structure remains the same, but the four Brotherhood emphasis will have a more solid missionary base. World Missions will emphasize missionary education and commitment to missions. Development in the area of Personal Stewardship will be an added emphasis on the support of missions. The area of Christian Witnessing will be tied in directly to Christian service through missionary activities; and work in Royal Ambassadors will be pointed towards missions advance.

Necessary helps for a Brotherhood president are the CHURCH PROGRAM GUIDEBOOK, the booklet entitled "The Role of Baptist Men and Boys in Missionary Education and Missions Promotion," the "Brotherhood Journal," and the BROTHERHOOD HANDBOOK.

Camp Caraway completed its first full season with 998 boys plus staff for ten weeks. There will be additional facilities for the 1965 season.

The final payment on the 1,050 acre Caraway site will be made next January.

In our Association the past year, a fine RA Conclave was held on November 5, with Missionaries Zeb and Evelyn Moss as speakers. On July 27-30, 67 boys and 7 counselors attended RA Camp at the South Mountain Baptist Camp. There were several rededications and professions of faith.

The Associational Brotherhood held two very fine meetings the past year. The speaker for the first one was Judge Forrest Robertson, and the speaker for the second meeting was Attorney B. T. Henderson of Winston-Salem.

The Associational Brotherhood President visited in seven of our churches during the year to promote the Brotherhood work. One Brotherhood was re-organized.

Woman's Missionary Union, did you buy **Christian Witnessing**, by Barnard? Sunday School, did you buy **The Ministry of Visitation**, by Sisemore? Brotherhood, did you buy **Effective Christian Witnessing**, by Tull? Are they in your Church Library? If the answer is "no," where are you going to send your personnel for information, inspiration and training? All these books are in classification 269 Public Spiritual Renewal.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT

The following report on Associational Missions, presented by W. V. Carroll, was adopted:

It has been a privilege to work another year with you good people of the Sandy Run Association. The associational missionary is very grateful for the privilege and for the cooperation that has been given.

We have not started any new mission work this year. So far as we know, all the rest homes are being ministered to by some church, and there is no need of a new work being started except in the State Prison Camp. We need some church or churches to send two workers there each Sunday morning to teach the Sunday School lesson and counsel with the prisoners.

The big need in our Association is to expand and strengthen the present work. There ought to be more people in our Sunday Schools, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Unions, and Brotherhoods. More church libraries and better use made of the ones we have are also needs.

Another thing, more people ought to be enlisted to do something for the Lord, and not place too many responsibilities on a few. What do you suppose the Lord thinks of his children, who fold their hands, sit placidly in an easy chair, and do nothing?

From the associational standpoint, how we need better cooperation and participation in the work. Have our churches started going in circles without spiritual vision and concern enough to do anything beyond their church fields?

Amidst all our needs to move up, 27 of our churches helped to make the Schools of Missions in September the finest I have ever been in.

During the year the missionary has visited in 174 services; delivered 33 sermons and addresses; taught 19 Sunday School lessons; presented pictures 10 times; helped examine and ordain two preachers; helped in two Vacation Bible Schools; held and attended 225 individual conferences and committee meetings and held numerous telephone conferences; conducted three VBS Clinics; attended 53 Associations; published 12 issues of bulletins and mailed 9,016 copies and 9,997 letters and cards; and traveled 9,769 miles.

We would like to express our great appreciation to the Florence Church for a nice, comfortable office, and to Miss Martha Jean McFarland,

our associational clerk and secretary, for her very fine help, to Brother Edgar Lineberger and Pastor T. W. Estes for their fine cooperation and excellent help. Brother Estes helped to make the Schools of Missions the success they were.

The following reports on Christian Education, Homes for the Aging, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes and State Missions were adopted.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

The Christian Life is an educational process whether it be taught in the home, church, an institution of higher learning or a combination of all of these. All of the church organizations are, or should be, an avenue in Christian Education. Since our concept of Christian Education enters into every aspect of our life, it is of vast importance that we be concerned and personally involved with any and all phases of work which include the growth of the Christian life.

North Carolina's seven Baptist Colleges are living testimonies that we are seeking to offer more to those who dare to seek a fuller life. Yet, we must be willing to do more for these institutions so they can become more effective instruments for the cause of Christ.

Our forefathers set about the tasks of providing colleges where Christian Education could be filtered into the mainstreams of life, we must continue to do justice to their task. Our responsibilities are great, but our potentialities are greater. Our burdens are heavy, but the results will be rewarding. The competition is overwhelming but victory shall come because we know the mission that lies behind the crisis.

The total enrollment for our seven Baptist Colleges is 11,188. There

are 489 individuals who are preparing for full time Christian service. To this date these institutions have graduated a total of 44,375 people.

HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

Our Baptist Homes have just completed their 13th year of operation and are entering into the 14th year with eager anticipation and with much enthusiasm. God has blessed these brief years with an abundance of His love and with the good things of life. We have come from one resident and one building, since March of 1951, to 160 residents and four buildings in 1964.

The choicest bit of news for 1964 is the development of a fifth Baptist Home, to be located at Yanceyville, N. C. We are hoping to begin construction on this new project during this year, and the burden of our hearts will have been relieved, in a measure, by being able to care for thirty additional residents. The Home of Yanceyville is the greatest single bequest that has ever been left for us in our ministry. Enough land at Yanceyville and money were given to the Baptist Foundation of North Carolina for us, by the late R. Sterling Groves, and his sister Mrs. Sallie Willie Groves Bradsher, to build and equip the home there. We will still need to look to our Baptist people for the maintenance of this home and for assistance in supplementing needy residents.

Support for these homes comes from Special Day offerings, received in the 3,400 Baptist churches and through the homes' share in the Cooperative Program.

Life among the residents these days is most interesting and filled with a variety of experiences. All are expressing thanksgiving to God for the people called, "Baptists," and for the happiness and security of the homes that our Baptist people are helping to make possible for them.

Let us join our hearts in prayer and our lives in dedication that we may give a good account of our stewardship in this great area of human concern and give an answer to as many of these dear people as possible.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

The trustees and administration of our Baptist Hospital have expressed their appreciation for the interest and concern our churches have shown in the ministry of the hospital. In behalf of thousands of our people who cannot pay for the skilled care received at our Medical Center, they express their thanks for our Mother's Day gifts which make this service possible.

This is a crucial year in the life of our hospital. It is serving more sick people than ever before in its history. For more than a year there has been an average of above 700 sick people on the waiting list for beds. A number of seriously ill and injured persons have had to be sent from the emergency rooms to other hospitals because no beds were available. The needs continue to grow faster than its capacity to serve.

Another difficult problem is that of meeting the cost of caring for those who cannot pay for the service they need. Our hospital tries to get all the help it can for these persons from welfare and health agencies, but these agencies do not pay the total cost and many persons are not eligible for such assistance.

The hospital receives a share of our Cooperative Program money, but the Mother's Day Fund is the only means the hospital has of bridging a wide gap between the funds available and the cost of caring for those who cannot pay for their medical service.

Our hospital and medical school are beginning a large development program to increase the capacity of our Medical Center. The people of the Winston-Salem area have expressed their confidence in our Medical Center by pledging more than seven million dollars to this enlargement program. When our hospital has increased its capacity to meet our specialized medical needs, will our churches provide the money to take care of those who cannot pay for these services but need them.

This is a heavy burden and we call upon our pastors and other church leaders to inform our people of the work and the great need. It is a greatly needed and wonderful ministry to which Jesus gave himself without reserve. We, who are his followers, must not fail those to whom he would minister through us.

Helping children and young people to grow and develop toward Christian maturity is one of the greatest privileges in life. It is the purpose of the Children's Homes to develop the highest quality of men and women possible out of boys and girls who are served.

Children are provided food, clothing and shelter when they come to the homes. But of greater importance than material things is the genuine interest, concern and love given every child by the Christian men and women who work with them. Many children who have known only heart-break and tragedy learn to love again — learn to trust in themselves, in adults and in God.

A member of this year's senior class expressed her appreciation for the Children's Homes in the following way: "Living at one of the homes has given me a chance to make something out of myself. I have been afforded the opportunity of getting a good education. Things have been learned and friendships have been formed which will bless my life as long as I live. Best of all I have learned to know, to trust, to follow and to serve Christ as my Saviour. I want North Carolina Baptists to know how very much I appreciate all that they have done for me and for thousands of other boys and girls who have needed a home, love and care."

Applications for the admission of children to the Homes far exceed resources with which to care for them. Many couples who have a double measure of love to share with homeless and dependent children have a wonderful opportunity of service awaiting them through the foster home program.

Financial support for the past year has come from the following sources: Cooperative Program, 36 per cent; Thanksgiving Offering, 30 per cent; Once-a-Month Offerings, 15 per cent, and all other, 19 per cent.

Most North Carolina Baptists are well acquainted with **Charity and Children**, official publication of the Baptist Children's Homes. This unique newspaper is published each week and goes to more than 55,000 subscribers. Well over half the Baptist churches in the state receive it in bundles for distribution to members on Sunday. See that your church receives **Charity and Children** so that every family may be better informed about the work of North Carolina Baptists, and particularly the program of child care. The subscription price is sixty cents per year in bundle form.

The deepest concern of State Missions is with people . . . people in all walks of life. The entire structural program of state missions is built around the aim of making an impact upon persons.

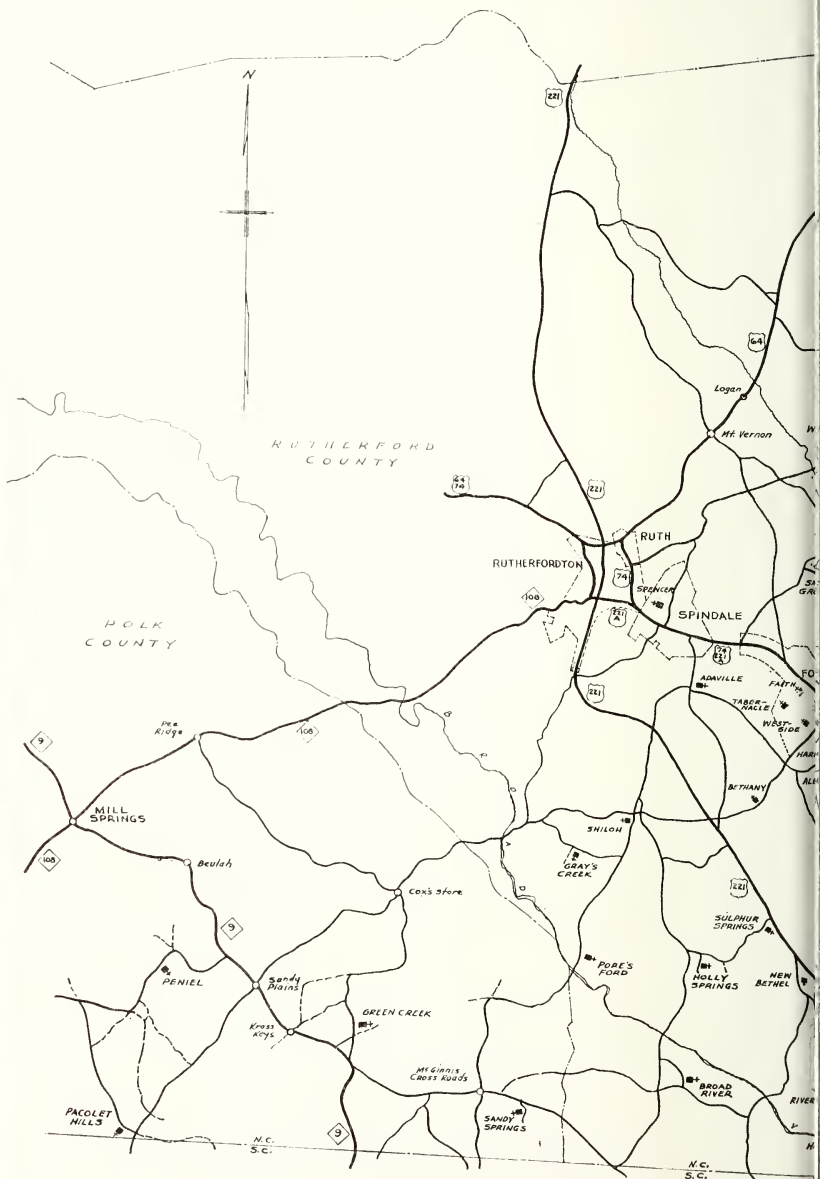
Churches making a generous contribution to State Missions help to undergird the work that is reaching thousands yearly with the message of our Saviour.

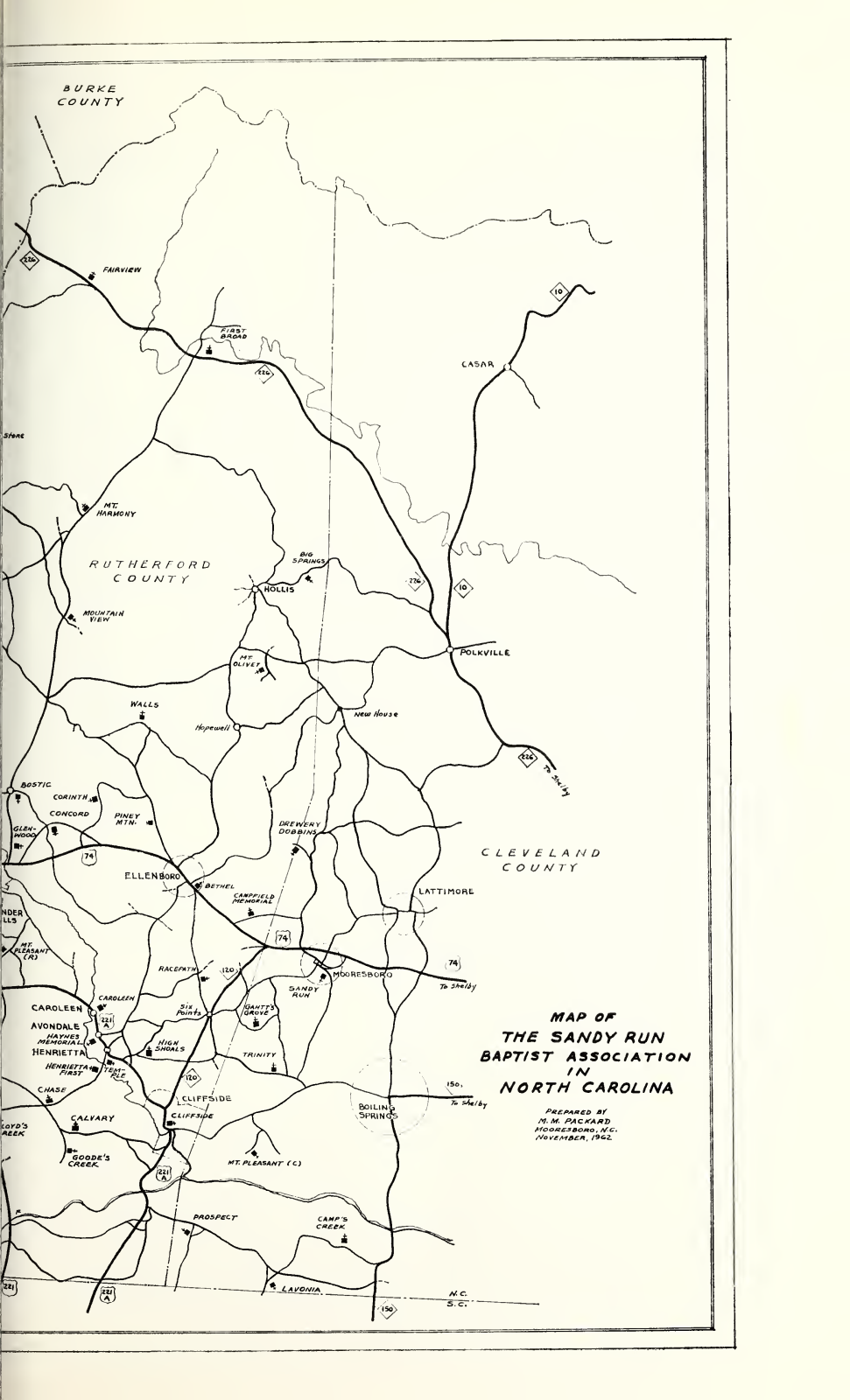

Following a "Medley of Hymns," a message, "Evangelism, Our Heart-beat," was brought by Rev. Harold White.

The meeting was adjourned to meet with Mt. Pleasant (C) on the following day.

There were 397 messengers and visitors registered on the first day.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 21, 1964

Mt. Pleasant (C) Baptist Church

The second day's session, meeting with the Mt. Pleasant (C) Baptist Church, opened with music meditation by James Hall followed with singing of the hymn, "I Know Whom I Have Believed."

After the hymn, "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah," by the Pastors and Music Directors' Choir, Rev. W. F. McGinnis led in a period of worship.

The reports on the Annuity Board, Baptist Foundation, Christian Life Committee, and Christian Literature were adopted as follows:

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

"Life Benefit Plan" is offered to church and denominational employees — Every pastor, church and denominational employee is eligible for the new group term Life Benefit Plan being offered by the Annuity Board, regardless of whether they are a member of one of the Board's retirement plans. The Board is currently in a campaign to enlist the 3,000 members needed to put the Life Benefit Plan into effect, and hopes to have it in operation by October 1 of this year.

Cost is Low — The new Plan provides low cost life protection to members while in active service, during disability or in actual age retirement. Cost is only 1% of the annual salary basis, with minimum basis of participation set at \$4,000 and maximum at \$12,000. Minimum payments will be \$3.34 a month and maximum payments, \$10.00.

Benefits are Large — The widow or beneficiary of a member 45 or under will receive 2½ times his salary basis of participation in the event of his death. Thus the widow of a man 44 years of age who was paying on a \$12,000 salary basis would receive \$30,000. If death was accidental her benefit would be twice this, or \$60,000.

Applications and information about the Life Benefit Plan may be obtained from the Annuity Board, 511 North Akard, Dallas, Texas 75201, or from your state annuity secretary, Rev. Guy Cain, 301 Hillsboro Street, Raleigh, N. C.

Membership in Retirement Plans — As of May 1, 1964, there were 16,251, or 50% of the total churches in the Southern Baptist Convention participating in the Annuity Board's retirement program with their pastors. Out of 174 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes, homes for the aged and other southwide agencies, 118 are enrolled in an

Annuity Board plan with their employees. Total membership in the Board's retirement plans is approximately 25,000.

Benefits Paid — More than \$43½ million have been paid in relief and annuity benefits by the Annuity Board since its beginning 1918. Last year these benefits were more than \$3¼ million, and were paid to ministers and denominational workers or their families who were members of a retirement plan, and to those on the relief rolls.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

In the widest sense Stewardship "is the maximum use of one's life for the glory of God and the good of mankind." The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., encourages the Stewardship of Current Income in systematic and proportionate giving from current income. The Foundation also encourages the Stewardship of Accumulated Possessions by single block giving at infrequent intervals from accumulated income during one's lifetime and/or at one's death. You will note that the Baptists have put the major emphasis on the Stewardship of Accumulated Income. There are many ways that the Foundation assists a person in making his gifts through accumulated income such as: (1) by living trust, (2) by gift annuity, (3) by bequests in wills.

The Foundation also serves by meeting with you and your attorney, upon your request, in connection with preparation of legal documents where the Baptist Foundation is to be involved. The Foundation offers services to individual churches, associations, and to all of our Baptist agencies and institutions.

The Foundation, emphasizing the making of Christian wills, has two films, "God's Will Through Yours" and "Treasures In Heaven," on Christian will making, which are available to any organization upon request.

CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION REPORT

The Christian Life Commission is the Southern Baptist agency assigned to work in the area of Christian social ethics. The Commission's purpose is to help Southern Baptists to make practical application of the gospel in such aspects of daily living as family life, race relations, moral issues, daily work, and Christian citizenship.

The Christian Life Commission seeks to discern what obedience to Jesus Christ means in the concrete situations of modern life. The Christian gospel declares that love is better than hate, that honesty is better than falsehood, that purity is better than filth, that peace is better than war, that justice is better than exploitation, that giving is better than getting, that "ideal" is more significant than "image," that character is better than popularity, that it is better to suffer for Christ's sake than to compromise with evil.

According to careful estimates, the Commission's written materials had a total circulation last year of 30,936,596. In addition, 261,537 tracts from

the Commission's 39 tracts now in print, were distributed on request to Southern Baptists.

The Commission works closely with the Christian Life Commissions in the various state conventions and in the associations. It publishes a Newsletter to keep in touch with these state and associational leaders. Special service is rendered to the denomination through a ministry in the areas of world peace with justice, human welfare, and counseling and guidance.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE REPORT

The winning of people to Christ and the training and development of our people must be carried on primarily through preaching, teaching, and the use of good religious literature. We must place in the hands of the people religious literature in the forms of tracts, magazines and books. The Bible, of course, occupies the chief place in our list of literature.

In the modern world nothing stays around very long that doesn't have some definite purpose and mission. The Biblical Recorder, now 131 years old, grows in strength and stature because its course is fixed upon the primary purpose of service to the Baptists of North Carolina.

Never has there been a day when the Christian witness was more needed in dealing with the problems of the world.

One of the main purposes of the Biblical Recorder is to inform. Baptists cannot properly do until they properly know. Its staff gathers, sifts, and publishes significant news from as many sources as possible. It keeps abreast of the important activities of the State Convention and its agencies and institutions. It also publishes news of the Southern Baptist Convention and of the entire Christian world.

Charity and Children, another source of Christian literature, has been published for over 76 years. It is printed on the campus of Mills Home in Thomasville, and is closely identified with the child care ministry. However, it publishes other Baptist news in the state. Charity and Children costs 60 cents a year if sent to the church in bund'le form. Individual subscriptions, sent weekly to each address, are \$1.00 a year.

We also have "Home Mission" and "Commission" with other various kinds of organizational literature. I feel we have the best literature of any denomination, and if we are not the best informed denomination, it is because we are failing to read.

J. J. Tarlton, former Superintendent of Rutherford County Schools, spoke on the Retirement Plans and M. W. Gordon, Jr. of Gardner-Webb College spoke on the Baptist Foundation.

Following the hymn, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee," C. W. Bazemore brought an address on Christian Literature.

Visitors were recognized from the Gaston, Union, Kings Mountain, Mecklenburg and Green River Associations.

The congregation was led in the singing of the hymn, "Send a Great Revival," which was followed by the report on Home Missions presented by James Estep. The report was adopted.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

There are now 2,299 missionaries serving in every state, Cuba, Panama, and Puerto Rico. An average of 30 missionaries were appointed each month last year. Yet critical personnel needs exist in mission center and Spanish-language work.

There were 645 student summer missionaries who served ten weeks in every state and Panama during the twentieth year of the ministry. Also, 750 Southern Baptist Chaplains presently serve in the military or with hospitals, industry and other institutions.

More than 6 million dollars came from Southern Baptists through the Cooperative Program, the Annie Armstrong offering, and from other sources of income. This amounted to about 62 cents or a nickel per month for each Southern Baptist.

New work and the Pioneer Areas received increasing support as the older and stronger states took additional financial responsibility. Two-thirds of the more than \$4 million spent by the Mission Division went to the newer states.

The mission opportunities in Puerto Rico were studied, and the Board voted to support work there on a limited basis in 1964.

The church extension program is receiving increased emphasis in preparation for its role as the major vehicle to continue the 30,000 Movement. The 30,000 Movement, in its climatic year in 1964, reported by January 1 that 5,884 churches and 16,016 missions had been started.

Fourteen programs of work were adopted by the Board at its midyear meeting, becoming effective January 1. They are church extension, associational administration services, pioneer missions, language missions, church loans, chaplaincy, metropolitan missions, urban-rural missions, Jewish work, mission center work, National Baptist, evangelism, survey and special studies, and special mission ministries.

A. B. Bumgarner spoke on the great needs of the pioneer areas and especially in North Dakota and made the following motion which was seconded by Elwood Orr:

"That our Association attempt the sponsorship of a mission in North Dakota and that our Associational Treasurer be authorized to receive and disburse funds given by the churches for this specific purpose; that the moderator appoint a committee from the contributing churches to work with our North Carolina representative in North Dakota, Rev. Albert Lamm, in determining the area of greatest need, and work out the details involved in such a relationship."

This motion carried after the adoption of the following amendment to the motion: "That it would be left in the hands of the executive committee to work out all of the details in the disbursement of funds."

Rev. Harold Wilson presented the following report on Foreign Missions which was adopted:

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

The Foreign Mission Board came to the close of 1963 with a mission staff in excess of 1,800, an objective toward which we have been working since 1948. Appointments totaling 195 during 1963 and 32 from January to May, 1964, bring the number of foreign missionaries in active service to 1,819. Twenty-seven missionary associates are included in this number.

Southern Baptists now have missionaries under appointment to 54 political entities. In each country, mission work is carried on through a varying number of institutions — churches, schools, hospitals, publication plants, good will centers. But all are interactive and the goal of each is evangelization. Whatever their institutional duties, all missionaries participate in work of the churches in their stations.

The major lesson to be learned from the history of the last 25 years of foreign missions is that in view of national and international circumstances which can greatly affect the work being done in any land, the wisest investment of missionary resources is in the cultivation of New Testament churches.

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$21,431,202.10 during 1963. Still, at year's end there were requests from the Missions (organizations of Southern Baptist missionaries) for more than \$3,000,000 for urgently needed land, buildings, and equipment. Funds from the 1963 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering totaled \$10,949,857.35.

Southern Baptist foreign missions reached out to two additional countries in 1963, and one in early 1964, but the "fields are white." In the words of Dr. Baker J. Cauthen, Executive Secretary of Foreign Missions we find our challenge. "Southern Baptists must measure our mission undertaking by our potential — not by what we or others have done. When we put what we are doing alongside the reality of human need and the reality of open doors in the world, we recognize that we have hardly begun. We must measure what we are doing by the crisis of our day. This is the day of destiny."

The following reports on the American Bible Society, Department of Program Services, and Christian Action League were adopted:

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The chief concern of the American Bible Society is to get the Bible into the hands of those who do not have it and do so in a way that will secure serious interest and receptive minds. This purpose is being accomplished through a program of translation, publication, distribution and Bible use promotion.

By the end of 1963 the Society had published portions of the Bible in 1,216 languages; the full Bible in 231 languages, the New Testament in 290 more new languages and dialects. However, there are still over 1,000 languages in our world that as yet have no translation of any portion of the Bible. We can help put the Word of God into the hands of these language groups through support of the American Bible Society.

Our missionaries often look to the Society for portions of the Scripture to use in their work around the world. After a missionary has had to leave a particular location a copy of the Gospel continues to witness to the people there.

In addition to the work done abroad the Society distributes Scripture volumes here at home to people who might not have access to them otherwise. Over a million volumes were distributed to the armed services last year. New Testaments can be purchased through the Society for as little as 21¢ a copy, making it possible for most people in America to have one.

Southern Baptists are second only to the Methodists in the support of the American Bible Society. We gave \$167,498 in 1963 compared to \$172,771 given by our Methodist brothers. We need to do more.

It is suggested that our churches give at least these amounts annually: Smaller churches, \$10 to \$60; Larger churches, \$60 to \$300; Big City churches, \$300 or more.

DEPARTMENT OF PROGRAM SERVICES REPORT

The Department of Program Services promotes the total Baptist program in the churches. The work of the department may be divided as follows:

- I. **AUDIO VISUAL AIDS:** The **Film Library** has film available on a **Free Rental** basis for church use which cover every area of denominational and church endeavor. The library has more than 2,300 35mm. filmstrips and more than 100 16 mm. films available. A **CATALOGUE LISTING ALL TITLES WITH DESCRIPTIONS IS AVAILABLE FREE UPON REQUEST.**

The department produces both 35mm. and 16 mm. **films** in support of total Baptist program for the departments of the General Board. Films produced this year included films produced for the Baptist Hospital, Associational Missions, and the Student Department.

The department will counsel with churches on such matters as: enforced sound, closed circuit TV, broadcast equipment, chime systems, visual installations, projection equipment, background projection, non-projected aids, recording facilities, lighting effects, radio loops, and screen installations.

Again this year **tape recordings** for use by the churches in the Convention were up 50% over the past year. The past year has seen a tremendous upsurge in the use of audio tape recordings.

- II. **GRAPHIC ARTS** — This service includes design and production of printed materials, posters, folders, diagrams, streamers, thematic settings, and many other types produced in support of the Baptist program.
- III. **NEWS SERVICE** — The Department of Program Services has the responsibility of news coverage of Baptist work in North Carolina to more than 350 outlets including newspapers, radio and television stations in North Carolina.
- IV. **TELEVISION AND RADIO** — The department continues to produce the Baptist network series of television programs, titled, **A LIGHT UNTO MY PATH**. This program is a mission work of the Convention designed to reach the minority groups including the deaf, the aging, and the unchurched in North Carolina.
- V. **OTHER AREAS** — The department shares in many and varied services of local, state and Convention-wide nature. It is the desire of the department to make its services available to every association and church.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE REPORT

The world renowned Dr. Albert Schweitzer has said, "Drink is our greatest wastrel, socially our greatest criminal, and morally and religiously our greatest enemy." This is true today.

It is estimated that in the year 1963 there were 68,000,000 American adults who drank alcoholic beverages in some degree. Of these, 9,500,000 were affected seriously; 5,400,000 were alcoholics; and 4,100,000 were problem drinkers (pre-alcoholics). Take into effect the fact that for each of these 9,500,000 there are five additional people in these homes whose lives are adversely affected by these drinkers. Alcohol is a potent factor in the destruction of many homes and its victims fill our jails. It is a major contributor to our awful crime rate now raging in our country, which incidently is at an all time peak, and still on the increase.

But the story does not end here. Alcohol is writing a very shameful and bloody record, on the highways of our land. In 1963 there were over 41,000 deaths on our highways, and nearly 4,000,000 injuries. Some estimates go as high as 75% in the relation of these accidents and alcohol. The Highway Patrol says that alcohol was a very evident factor in over 50% of the fatal accidents on our highways, and no indictment of this menace can be made too strong.

EVANGELISM REPORT

The report on Evangelism was presented by Rev. A. B. Bumgarner and was adopted. Dr. Forrest C. Freezor, former pastor in this State and Texas, and former Executive Secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, and now Interim Pastor of the First Baptist Church, Shelby, brought an address on "Challenges We Face."

The special five-year effort (known as Baptist Jubilee Advance), in evangelism and missions on the part of the Baptists of North America came to a close at the joint meeting of the groups in Atlantic City, New Jersey, in May, 1964. What was done is now history and we cannot go back to improve or to change the record.

The record of our association reveals the following additions to the churches in 1964:

By baptism, 378. By letter 468. Total, 846.

The inevitable question arises, where do we go from here? What shall we do in 1965?

We can and we must search our hearts before God to find His will for us and to experience His empowering as we endeavor to be obedient to His commands. This we need as individual Christians, as churches and as a denomination.

Most of us need to take a fresh look at evangelism as it is practiced in our personal lives and in our local church. To do this on the right

basis, we must first make an earnest effort to see what evangelism is as it is revealed in the New Testament. A good definition of the New Testament picture of evangelism is found in the new **Southern Baptist Handbook on Evangelism** which is as follows: "Evangelism is the outreach of the church by confrontation with the gospel of Christ to bring people to a personal faith and commitment to Christ as Saviour and Lord, in order that the committed may become a part of the outreach."

This wonderful experience of Christ confronting the lost through His people will not become a reality in a life or a church merely by accepting and adopting a creed, a statement of doctrine, a set of rules for conduct. There must be the experience of being **in Christ** and a perennial vigilance in seeking to be used of Christ in His purpose of redemption. In the light of these and other pressing truths we should ever keep before us these objectives:

1. To keep all programming and activities aimed at creating a spiritual atmosphere for evangelism in every church.
2. To keep alive a perennial awareness of the urgency of personal witnessing on the part of every Christian.
3. To refine and intensify our revival efforts.
4. To seek to keep the message positive, practical, scriptural and spiritual with unceasing prayer and diligence.
5. To spare nothing in seeing to it that the new and old church members become a part of the outreach.

History of Host Churches

SHILOH BAPTIST CHURCH

Shiloh Baptist Church was the outgrowth of a small band of faithful believers who first met in the year 1833. On April 18, 1834 a church was organized and given the name Shiloh Baptist Church. This church joined the Broad River Association the same year that it was organized. The first church was built of logs and was located near the present site of the church. A more serviceable building was later constructed and was replaced in 1910 by a more modern building with a seating capacity of 800. This building was destroyed by fire in 1940 and the present building was constructed to replace it in 1940.

In the year 1959 the Shiloh Church greatly enlarged the educational building and installed a new heating system.

In 1963 Shiloh added to its building a well constructed steeple, portfolio doors, and exterior painting.

In 1964 Shiloh paid off indebtedness, re-roofed the church building, landscaped grounds, placed tile in two classrooms, installed chime system, and paved the parking area.

In 1965 the church purchased 12.5 acres of land for future needs at the cost of \$9,460.00.

The church history would not be complete were we not to mention the "good old negro slaves" who once had their names on the church roll, and occupied seats in the rear of the building when they came with their masters to worship. Mr. Watson Abrams, one of the earliest prominent members of the church, owned a number of slaves.

Shiloh Church has played a vital part in the religious life of this area. Churches that have grown out of the church are: Holly Springs, Adaville, Bethany, Mountain View, West Point, Gray's Creek, and Sulphur Springs.

The present membership is 462, and Rev. Cecil Cothran is now serving as pastor. He came to the church in December of 1961.

Present value of church property is approximately \$100,000.

BOSTIC BAPTIST CHURCH

On a Sunday afternoon, 1910, a group of men and women in and around Bostic decided to organize a Baptist church. They held their first meetings in a one room school house.

The first church building, which was a framed structure, was erected where the present church building now stands. On the fourth Sunday, February, 1911, the congregation held its first services in their new church building. A presbytery was called together for the purpose of reorganizing the Bostic Church with 36 charter members. Rev. C. E. Beaver was elected to serve as the church's first pastor. The church grew and in order to meet the challenge of growth, the church voted on August 24, 1930 to tear down the old frame structure and erect a brick building which is in use today.

The first services in the brick building were held May 31, 1931. The Reverend I. D. Harrill was pastor at the time this building was erected.

A new educational plant was added in 1961 to take care of the growing need.

The church saw a need for a home for their pastor and several years back purchased a frame structure house to serve as their parsonage. This building was later sold and a new modern up-to-date parsonage was built in 1960.

In 1961 the name of the church was changed from Bostic Baptist Church to First Baptist Church of Bostic. On February 26, 1961 the church celebrated its 50th anniversary.

The First Baptist Church has been served by several faithful and dedicated pastors in the past, with the capable Rev. Tyler LeRoy serving as the present pastor.

With gratitude for the many blessings of the years that are now history, the church faces the future with a sense of responsibility and an even greater possibility of service to her Lord and humanity.

Constitution

Article I — Name

This body shall be known as the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

Article II — Membership

Sec. 1. The Association shall be composed of Baptist Churches of Rutherford County, Cleveland County and Polk County which are now members, and any other Baptist churches which may hereafter be admitted as provided

Sec. 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented by her pastor and two representatives. Any church with more than fifty members shall be entitled to a messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. New churches may be admitted by a majority vote of messengers present after careful examination and found to be regular in their organization, orthodox in their doctrine, and supporting objects of the Association. State, and Southern Baptist Conventions. Churches are to be accepted under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year in order that the above may be determined.

Sec. 4. The Association may at any time dissolve connection with any church that becomes heterodox in doctrine or disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Sec. 5. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure.

Sec. 6. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming up to the Association, each claiming to represent the church; neither party shall be seated as messengers until the question is decided as to which party is the church in union with the Association. The decision is made by a majority of messengers present.

Article III — Objects

The objects of the Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence, and spiritual power of the churches and to direct, promote, and develop their energies in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the State Baptist Convention, and the Association itself.

Article IV — Meetings

Sec. 1. The Association shall meet in annual session on Tuesday and Wednesday after the third Sunday in October of each year. The Moderator shall call the body to meet in extra session if necessity shall arise.

Section 2. The Associational year shall begin October 1 of each year and close September 30 of the following year.

Article V — Officers and Duties

Sec. 1. The officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, As-

sociate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Librarian and leaders of the organized work in the Association, who shall be chosen annually by a majority present.

Sec. 2. The officers shall perform all duties usually devolving upon such officers in well deliberative assemblies.

Sec. 3. The term of Moderator shall not exceed more than two consecutive years.

Sec. 4. The Missionary of the Sandy Run Baptist Association shall work with and assist the churches and missions of the Association in the promotion of their work and shall be under the supervision of the Associational Board.

Article VI — Associational Board

Sec. 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of the officers of the Association (Article V, Sec. 1) who shall also be the officers of this Board with the Moderator as chairman, the leader of each of the Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music, Library), the Associational Missionary (ex-officio), the Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representatives on the Baptist State Convention General Board, each active pastor, and two members selected by each active church of the Association.

Sec. 2. This body shall act for the Association in the interim between annual sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, neither taking any action contrary to the will of the Association, nor initiating any new policy or practice binding upon the Association, unless specifically so directed. However, in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action so taken shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for its consideration.

Sec. 3. The Board shall be divided into committees with assigned duties (Article VII, Sec. 1).

Sec. 4. The Clerk will make a report to the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 5. This body shall meet on Thursday following the second Sunday in each quarter of the calendar. The place may be decided.

Article VII — Committees and Their Duties

Sec. 1. ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD COMMITTEES. The Associational Board, shall be divided by the Committee on Committees into the following committees with their duties.

1. ADVISORY STEERING COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Associational Missionary, the leader of each Associational Organization (Pastor's Conference, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music), Chairman of Evangelism, the Associational Representative of the Baptist State Convention General Board, the Chairman of the Associational Board Committee 2-7, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and Librarian. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

(1) To study and act upon any matters of business of the Associational Board between quarterly meetings of the Board. Any action taken shall be dependent upon the approval of the Associational Board.

(2) To counsel and advise any committee or church in the Association on any suggestion that may be submitted to it.

(3) To counsel, advise, and direct the Associational Missionary and recommend to the Associational Board any necessary change in any phase of the work.

(4) To assist the Associational Missionary in his work and, in event of his resignation, this Committee shall be responsible for finding and recommending a successor to the Associational Board.

(5) To work with the Associational Missionary in formulating a calendar of activities for the Association.

2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. This committee and its chairman, consisting of nine members, shall be appointed by the Moderator of the Association soon following the annual session of the Association. It shall, as soon as possible, meet and assign the members of the Associational Board to the various committees, naming the chairman of each except as otherwise provided, and name the Standing Committees and their chairman (Article VII, Sec. 2). Also, it shall name any other committee assigned to it.

3. COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM. This committee shall be composed of the Associational Chairman of Evangelism and members assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings and organizations of the Association. It shall also encourage and help arrange revivals in every section of the Association and lead in simultaneous revivals. The chairman will submit a written report to the annual session of the Association.

4. COMMITTEE ON ORDINATIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. It shall serve in an advisory capacity when called upon to assist in the examination and ordination of deacons and candidates for the gospel ministry.

5. COMMITTEE ON LOCATION OF NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS. This Committee and its chairman shall be assigned by the Committee on Committees. Its duties shall be as follows:

(1) Receive and consider any request by any group for a mission to be organized into a Baptist church and recommend action to the Associational Board.

(2) Be alert to develop any lead that might be given toward the establishment of a new church or mission. Advise with the group, or groups, involved what steps should be taken in the location and/or organization of a mission or church.

(3) Consider applications from any church or churches desiring membership in the Sandy Run Association and make recommendations to the Associational Board as to what action should be taken.

6. COMMITTEE ON FINANCES, BUDGET, AND AUDITING. This Committee shall be composed of the Treasurer as chairman, Moderator, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, W. M. U. President, Brotherhood President, Church Music Director, and as many other members as the Committee of Committees may deem wise. This Committee shall prepare and recommend a budget for the Associational Program and suggest ways and means to the churches whereby the budget can be raised. It shall be responsible for auditing the Treasurer's book.

7. COMMITTEE ON FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. The Committee on Committees, shall appoint this Committee, naming the chairman, and assign as many members as it deems wise. It shall consider all church or mission requests for pastoral aid and requests to be made to the State or Home Mission Boards for aid or loans in buying church lots and shall make recommendations concerning them to the Associational Board.

8. COMMITTEE FOR COUNSELING WITH CHURCHES, CHURCH GROUPS, AND PASTORS: This committee shall be composed of five members and shall not include the Associational Missionary. The chairman shall be named. DUTIES: This committee shall counsel and advise any church, church group, or pastor, seeking help in difficulties.

9. COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS. This Committee and its chairman shall be named by the Committee on Committees. It shall bring a suitable report at the annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches to have died since the last annual session.

10. COMMITTEES TO REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL WORK. These are Committees on (1) State Missions, (2) Home Missions, (3) Foreign Missions, (4) Christian Literature, (5) Christian Education, (6) Children's Homes, (7) Homes for the Aging, (8) Baptist Hospital, (9) Annuity, (10) Temperance and Civil Righteousness, (11) Stewardship, (12) American Bible Society, (13) Christian Life, and (14) Baptist Foundation. These Committees and their chairman, composed of not less than five members, shall be named by the Committee on Committees. Their duties shall be to inform our people about the work they are chosen to represent and lead in promoting it. The chairman of each Committee shall make a brief written report at the annual session of the Association.

Sec. 2. STANDING COMMITTEES. These Committees and their chairman shall also be appointed by the Committee on Committees, at the time the Associational Board Committees are appointed, but they are not necessarily composed of Board members. They shall serve through the annual session of the Association. These Committees are:

1. TIME, PLACE, AND PREACHER COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of five members and shall report at the annual session. It shall state the time of the next annual meeting of the Association (Article IV, Sec. 1), recommend the place or places of the meeting and recommend the preacher and the alternate.

2. PROGRAM COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of three members and the Moderator, Associational Music Director, Associational Missionary, and host pastor or pastors. It shall prepare a printed program for the annual meeting of the Association which shall be sent to all persons on the program, and to all pastors, at least thirty days before the annual meeting. It shall, in the opening of the annual meeting of the Association, present the printed program for adoption and serve through the session when adjustments in the order of business become necessary.

3. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE. This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall draw up and present to the Association resolutions of applications and any other resolution it may deem expedient. Also, resolutions and recommendations presented at the annual session may be referred to this committee.

4. **NOMINATING COMMITTEE.** This Committee shall be composed of five members. It shall contact and nominate to the Associational Board in its July meeting for election all the leaders of Associational Organizations (Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Music, Library), so these leaders in turn can present their helpers to the Association in annual session for election. The Committee shall also contact and nominate at the annual session of the Association all Associational Officers, (Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Associate Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Librarian) and the chairman of Evangelism.

Article VIII — Trustees

Sec. 1. There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one preferably a lawyer.

Sec. 2. The Trustees and their chairman shall be appointed annually by the Committee on Committees at the time this Committee appoints the Associational Board Committees.

Sec. 3. Their duties shall be to hold title to property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association with the Association or Associational Board's free knowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution of the Association, and with State laws as they affect the Association.

Article IX

This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers in attendance, provided that notice is given and the proposed amendment is stated during the first day, but no vote shall be taken upon the proposed amendment until the afternoon session of the second day.

Rules of Order

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with song and prayer.

2. The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association. He shall appoint all committees unless otherwise provided for.

3. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be considered an authority in all cases not provided for in the Rules Of Order: "but in cases where the meaning may not be clear, the Presiding Officer may use his discretion subject to an appeal to the Association."

4. Brethren invited to sit with us shall have the liberty of discussion, but not of voting.

5. Speakers shall rise and address the Moderator, and shall confine themselves to the subject under discussion. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the Association.

6. No questions shall be discussed without a motion thereon first being made and seconded. Motions made and seconded shall be stated by the Moderator previous to any discussion thereon. If motion contains two or more parts, it shall be divided at the request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote of the body.

ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD REPORT

The report of the transactions of the associational board was presented by Martha Jean McFarland and was adopted as follows:

On October 30, 1964, upon recommendation from the Steering Committee, the following changes were made in the Calendar of Activities which was presented for 1965: That the Associational Board and Board Committees meet on the second Thursday night in the first month of each calendar quarter; that the Sunday School, Training Union, and Library Organizations, and the WMU and Brotherhood officers meet on the second Thursday in the second month of each quarter; and that the WMU and Brotherhood Organizations, and the Sunday School, Training Union, and Library officers meet on the second Thursday night in the third month of the quarter with the exception of the Training Union "M" Night which is to be held at the usual time.

The committee on committees having divided the board members into the various committees presented their report which was approved.

On January 14, 1965, a motion carried that our association adopt a goal of 5,066 tithers by March, 1966 and that the churches be urged to set goals for an increase of tithers in their individual churches.

A motion from the Committee on Children's Homes passed that each church be urged to increase their contribution to the Children's Homes by 5% over last year's contributions.

On April 8, 1965, upon a recommendation from the Steering Committee, the date of September 2 was set for the Associational Stewardship Supper.

The Treasurer's report was presented and churches were urged to send in their contributions monthly rather than annually.

On May 20, 1965, the board met in a called meeting. A motion was made by John Lucas and seconded by Mrs. James Marchman that the first day of the Annual Session be held in the afternoon and evening rather than in the morning and afternoon in order that more of our people who work would be able to attend. The motion carried.

A motion was made by Elwood Orr and seconded by Charlie Blackwell that the moderator appoint a committee to arrange the churches in adjoining fields into groups and work out a schedule when each of the groups would be asked to entertain the association in its annual session. The motion passed.

The following were elected to serve as officers for the Associational Stewardship Emphasis: Joe Bridges, Co-ordinator; W. V. Carroll, Promotion Chairman; P. B. Price, Budget Committee Chairman; William A. Stroud, Stewardship Conference Chairman; Elwood Orr, Supper Arrangements Chairman; Mrs. James Marchman, Reservation Committee Chairman; and Sam Hargett, Stewardship Testimonies Committee Chairman.

Guy Cain, Secretary of the Annuity Department of the State Convention, spoke to the board members on the Retirement and Security plans for church employees.

On July 8, 1965, a motion carried that the Committee on Committees either appoint a committee to study the constitution in regard to making

changes in the constitution to comply with the meeting time of the board or that they study the constitution themselves and recommend the change.

A suggestion was made that each of the organizational heads talk with his officers and find out their feelings concerning having the various organizational meetings as we have for the past year and bring their findings to the Steering Committee.

In the absence of the Nominating Committee's report, a motion carried that the heads of the various organizations be re-elected to serve for the coming year subject to their approval.

On October 4, 1965, the following grouping of the churches for entertaining the annual session of the association was presented and after a motion by Tyler Leroy and a second by Charles Ginn, the grouping was approved.

The proposed budget for 1965-66 was presented and was approved for recommendation to the annual session for approval.

A motion carried that our association hold a clinic on evangelism on January 20, 1966. After a motion by Cecil Cothran, it was voted that our association hold Simultaneous Revivals, March 20 — April 3, 1966.

A motion was made that the committee on committees be instructed to appoint a church counseling committee whose responsibility it would be to counsel with pastors, churches and church groups who are having difficulties and offer any help that might be feasible, and that the constitution be changed to include this committee. It was suggested that our associational missionary not be a member of this committee.

A recommendation to amend this motion to set the committee number at five was approved.

The motion as amended was passed.

A motion carried that the sum of \$800 from the Missionary's Salary be designated as "housing allowance." (This would include the cost of utilities that is provided for in the budget.) This is in line with provision of the tax office and eliminate the necessity of his paying tax on this part of his salary unnecessarily. It will not affect in any way the financial responsibility of the association.

Following the congregational hymn, "Blessed Assurance," in the absence of James Daniel, Dr. R. W. Falwell, head of the programing section of the Baptist Student Union of the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee, spoke on "New Horizons in Baptist Effectiveness."

The Associational WMU officers presented a skit on witnessing entitled, "You A Missionary." Following it, the meeting adjourned to meet with the Bostic Baptist Church on the following day.

There were 388 messengers and visitors registered on the first day.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 20

First Baptist Church, Bostic, N. C.

The second day's session, meeting with the First Baptist Church, Bostic, opened with music meditation by Mrs. Thomas Tisdale and Mrs. Norris Smith.

Following the hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story," Bill Holland led in prayer. Edgar Lineberger sang "The Name of Jesus" and scripture was read by W. V. Carroil. After which, the congregation was led in the singing of "Take the Name of Jesus with You."

Visitors from other associations were recognized.

H. L. Ferguson, pastor of the Thomasboro Baptist Church, Charlotte, spoke on the Christian Action League, presenting the picture of alcohol as a trap.

In the absence of Gordon Maddrey, T. Max Linnens, pastor of the Boiling Springs Baptist Church, spoke on the Baptist Foundation.

The structure of the Baptist State Convention was presented by Rev. Dewey Hobbs, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Marion.

Following the hymn, "Open my Eyes," Elwood Orr presented, "The Way We Finance our Program," by use of a stack of boxes showing the different percentages of the Cooperative Program dollar given to the various causes.

Guy Cain, State Secretary of the Annuity Board, Raleigh, spoke briefly on the Annuity Board and the different retirement plans.

During the business session, a motion carried that the Moderator ap-

point a committee of five laymen to make a study of the Annuity Board plans available for pastors and to work out plans to present them to the churches of our association, and that the results of the study being conducted by a committee of the General Board of the State Convention be included in this report to the churches.

The following motion presented by Hugh McBrayer was adopted: "Many of you remember earlier this year when a group of citizens of Rutherford County met to discuss the possibility of getting our Representative to the North Carolina General Assembly, Mr. Hollis M. Owens, Jr., to introduce a bill in the House of Representative giving the go-ahead to hold an election and vote on a beer referendum in our County Mr. Owens immediately told this group that he would not introduce any legislation to this effect because he did not think and feel that it was in the best interest of the citizens of Rutherford County. I recommend that the Sandy Run Association write Mr. Hollis M. Owens, Jr., presenting him with a citation, noting the 'real courage and strength of conviction.'

Hollis Owens, our representative to the N. C. General Assembly, was presented and spoke briefly concerning his stand on the request for the introduction of the bill.

The reports as appear on pages 38-57 in these minutes were adopted.

Marse Grant, editor of the BIBLICAL RECORDER, spoke on the BIBLICAL RECORDER.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

"... the word of the Lord abides forever. That word is the good news which was preached to you."

This year the American Bible Society is one hundred and fifty years old, but the Book that is our purpose for existence is ageless. Its message is as relevant today as it was in 1816. The Society is convinced that the Bible will continue to speak with power and truth in the unfolding space age.

Since its founding, the American Bible Society has carried on a dynamic program of translation, production, distribution and encouragement of use of the Holy Scriptures.

1. Translation. Continuous counsel, supervision and financial assistance for translators in translating and revising the Scriptures into many of the world's languages and dialects.

2. Publication. Manufacture, in the USA and Overseas, of volumes in many styles and sizes for varied needs and uses.

3. Distribution. By sale and by donation (with particular consideration for the blind and those in need of a special ministry), through the Society's agencies and distributors, churches, Christian workers, missionaries, pastors, evangelists and other volunteer helpers.

4. Encouragement of reading and use. Sponsorship of many programs in depth, such as the "Study of the Place and Use of the Bible" in the churches; Worldwide Bible Reading; Universal Bible Sunday; Reading of the Easter and Christmas Stores; Bible Book Clubs and others, through the press, radio, television and printed literature.

The Society's work is made possible solely by voluntary gifts from churches and individuals. The single purpose of the American Bible Society is to help in the sowing and sharing of God's word throughout the world.

ANNUAL BOARD REPORT

THE LIFE BENEFIT PLAN was inaugurated on October 1, 1964 to meet the need for supplemental life protection for our pastors and denominational employees, and has already achieved phenomenal success with more than ten thousand active participants. It offers protection ranging from ten to thirty thousand dollars for death under age 46 with graduated benefits thereafter for dues of \$3.34 to \$10.00 per month. It is still open for membership.

THE HEALTH BENEFIT PLAN is an all-inclusive program of hospital, surgical and major-medical protection which is now being offered. The target date for the beginning of this plan is October 1, 1965. Five thousand applications are required by September 1 in order to put this program into effect.

It has been said by many annuitants that the checks which come from the Annuity Board each month are like "Manna from Heaven." These checks vary in size, depending upon the length of time one was a member and the amount of dues paid.

Since the beginning of the Annuity Board in 1918, almost 47 million dollars have been paid in relief and annuity benefits to the men and women of God who serve Southern Baptists. In 1964 alone, 3½ million was paid out to ministers and denominational workers or their families.

Today more than 16,352 churches are in the Protection Program for their pastors. Approximately 10,000 of these churches are paying the total 10% dues. In Sandy Run Association, 42 churches participate. 13 churches pay the 10% dues for their pastors or employees.

There are now 127 of the 176 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes, homes for the aged and other southwide agencies protected by one of the Annuity Board programs. This means more than 25,000 members are in the Annuity Board's retirement plans.

There are seven states with 70% or more of the churches in the plan, At the present time North Carolina has 46% of the churches in the Protection Program for ministers.

Rev. Guy Cain, 301 Hillsboro Street, Raleigh, N. C. 27600, is jointly employed by the North Carolina Baptist Convention and the Annuity Board. He promotes the Board's total program of protection by trying to enlist all pastors, churches and denominational employees who are not enrolled in the program in North Carolina. He works to help those who are in the program to better understand the protection they have.

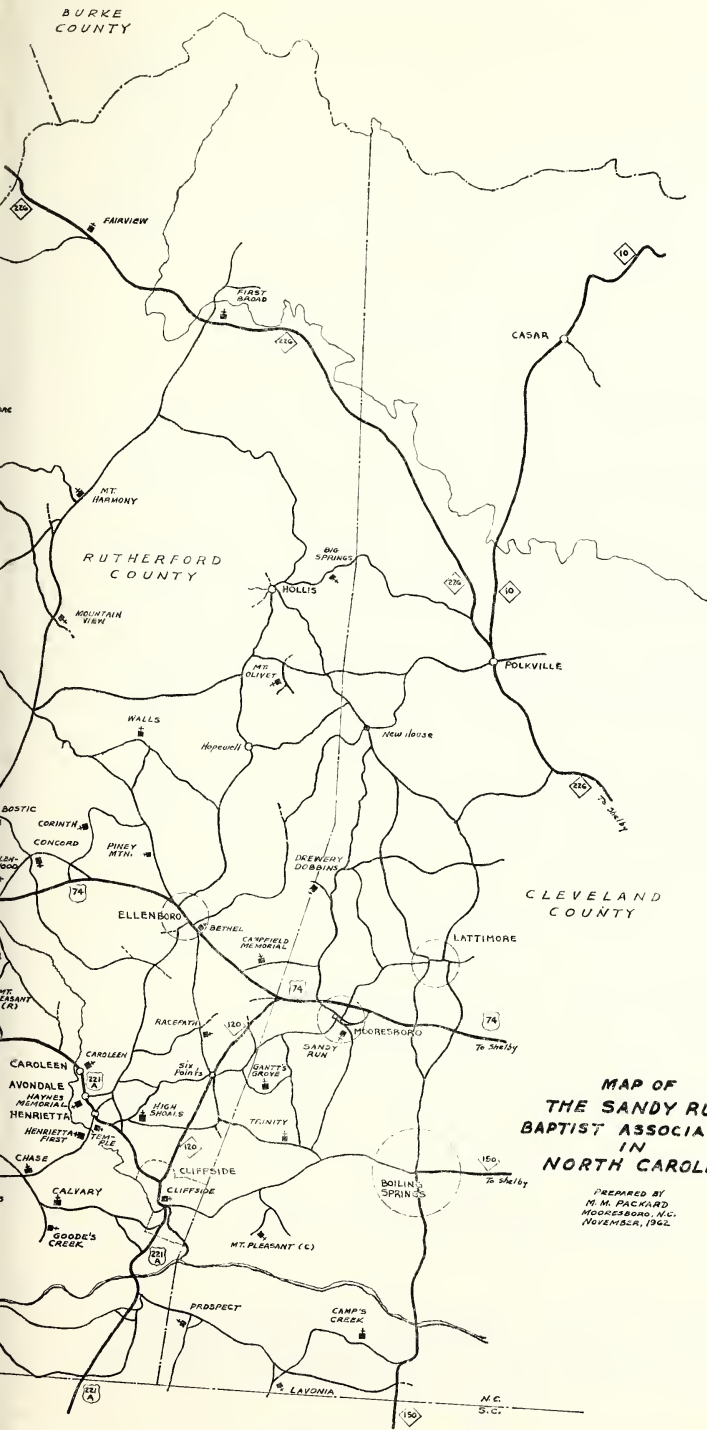

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT

Associational missions in the Sandy Run Association is ideally designed to reach out into every church to promote and strengthen the work. It is near by; it has something of the "know how;" and it is willing and anxious to help. However, the very nature and teachings of Baptists and of a Baptist church stop this help at the church's door if the church doesn't say, "We accept your help." Many of our churches could profit greatly if they would accept help in the Sunday Schools, the Training Union, the Woman's Missionary Union, the Brotherhood, Music, and Library areas of work. Also, many of them need help in the stewardship field of their work.

During the year your missionary has visited in 118 services; delivered 34 sermons and addresses; taught 19 Sunday School classes; presented pictures 33 times; helped ordain two preachers; conducted 2 associational VBS clinic and helped in one VBS; taught one five night study course; held 143 individual and committee conferences in addition to numerous telephone conferences; attended 49 associational meetings and 32 clinics, conferences, and committee meetings outside the association; published 12 issues of bulletins and mailed 9,399 copies and 10,560 letters and cards; and traveled 8,253 miles in addition to going to the Baptist World Alliance.

The Thanksgiving Offering of last year is approaching three hundred ten thousand dollars (\$310,000.00) and is the largest ever given.

Two estates have made possible fine buildings which have just been completed on the Mills Home campus. These buildings will fill a most useful purpose in the educational and religious life of the Mills Home family.

There is a growing need for Christian foster homes. Many families are finding an opportunity for service in caring for foster children. Thus, many boys and girls are privileged to grow up in Christian homes who otherwise would not have this opportunity. Should you have an "extra measure of love" to share in this way, the Homes would like to know of your interest.

The need for a Home in the western part of the state, to serve the people west of the Blue Ridge Mountains, has been discussed. The possibility of such a home is meeting with genuine interest and enthusiasm.

Members of the Board of Trustees and members of the staff of the Children's Homes are committed to the task of maintaining a Christian program of child care — a program that will merit the undivided support and loyalty of our people and that will bring honor to our Lord. To that end it is their purpose to meet as effectively as possible, the challenges of our day.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE

Beverage alcohol is enemy number one in our state and nation. The wise man said about strong drink (Prov. 23:32): "At the last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an ader." Strong drink has sent more souls unprepared to Judgment than all the wars and pestilences since

the beginning of the human race. Officers have estimated that over half of all highway wrecks are caused by drivers under the influence of alcohol. Near 1,100 people have lost their lives on the N. C. highways this year.

"Many drinkers first started by taking a social drink. We will use the name John Doe who had a good job and fine family consisting of his wife and three children. The habit of using liquor grew on him. His wife could stand it no longer. She took the children and left him after 'kicking him out.' Today John Doe is a physical wreck — health gone, family gone, and he is on the mercy of the world — all because he started out as a social drinker."

"The American people spend over ten billion dollars for strong drink annually. North Carolinians about one hundred million dollars yearly for strong drink. There are over half a million alcoholics in N. C. now, and the rate is growing yearly. This terrible waste of money and human life could be eliminated if we could abolish strong drink. The brewers of this state and nation are doing their best to get more ABC stores in operation. Town after town in N. C. has voted in Equor stores this year. We need more people with a backbone and less "wishbone."

CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION REPORT

Recognizing that a moral revolution is taking place in the nation, the Christian Life Commission has sought to help Southern Baptists relate the gospel to the specific moral problems of contemporary life, This

includes such aspects of daily experience as family life, race relations, moral issues, daily work and Christian citizenship.

The responsibilities of the modern Christian to society seem to multiply for two apparent reasons. One reason is the growing awareness that the gospel is a message of salvation, love, mercy, and justice for all men. Moreover, the sovereignty of God and the Lordship of Christ extend to every area and relationship of life. Sinister forces of unrighteousness are invading his home and community. These include a growing traffic in obscene literature, an alarming increase in alcoholism, acceleration of divorce statistics, and the tragic excesses of race prejudice.

These invading forces have received the special attention of the Christian Life Commission through its literature program, its special conferences, and through staff consultation and services. Written materials from the Commission had a total circulation last year of 30,913,165.

The Christian Life Commission selected two areas of its work for special emphasis in its annual conferences at the Southern Baptist assemblies. These were a study of gambling and the problem of alcohol.

As always, the Christian Life Commission is eager to strengthen associational ministries in the continuing task of creating a moral climate in which the Southern Baptist witness for Christ can be most effective.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Our Home Mission work is growing in need and importance. It has been pointed out by personal director of Home Mission work that this may be the area in which we give to the world a real example of Christianity in a world filled with conflicts. Let us join our hearts in prayer for the work that is ahead for the Home Mission Board.

REPORT ON HOMES FOR THE AGING

The day that North Carolina Baptists launched a ministry to the aging fourteen years ago was a good day indeed. Since that time four Homes for the Aging have come into being, and a fifth one is in the making. Many elderly people have been blessed by this compassionate ministry through the years, and today 160 people are in residence at Resthaven, and the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem, the Albemarle Home in Albemarle, and the Hamilton Home in Hamilton. When the proposed new Home at Yanceyville is completed, there will be capacity for 200. It is anticipated that construction will begin on the Yanceyville Home during 1965.

This labor of Christian love and nurture is ours together, and we could

not operate without the concern, the prayers, and the financial support of our Baptist people. This financial aid from the churches comes to us through two very vital avenues—the Special Day Offering, received on the third Sunday of February each year, and the Cooperative Program. Special Day Offering receipts for 1964 were at an all-time high and exceeded \$96,000.00. Through these gifts we are able to supplement from 80% to 90% of our needy residents who could not be with us otherwise.

It is urgently hoped that the Special Day Offering for 1965 will be the greatest ever, especially in view of the pressing and ever-increasing needs of the aging in our midst who seek our help. The waiting list now is 175 and grows almost daily.

As the great heart of the Saviour yearns for all in the various areas of human need, we are grateful that He has commissioned us to include also a special ministry to the aged among us. We have responded to His plea, we are giving an answer to Him for these elderly people who are very dear to Him, and we pray that every church in our State Baptist Convention will be very careful to give increasing emphasis to this vital ministry.

REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITAL

More than 35,000 sick people were seen in the clinics of our Baptist Medical Center in Winston-Salem last year, and more than 19,000 were hospitalized for bed care. These sick people came from all sections of our state, out of all kinds of financial circumstances, and with almost every type of serious disease and sickness known to man. Most of them were sent by their local doctors, because they had problems which were difficult of diagnosis or treatment, and needed specialized facilities and skills such as those found at our Baptist Hospital.

In addition to the sick people who were served, there were more than 700 persons in training in the various fields of medical care and Christian service. These students were studying in ten different schools, and in other fields of training in our Medical Center, and will go out to serve as physicians, nurses, technicians, pastors and other Christian workers, in our communities and churches throughout North Carolina and on our mission fields, around the world. These schools offer excellent opportunities, and they are interested in qualified, Baptist young people who wish to invest their lives in useful service to their fellow man and in the Kingdom of God.

The ministry of our hospital to people who are seriously ill and in meager circumstances lies at the very heart of its total work. All of our Mother's Day Offering are used for this purpose: when the doctors have given their skilled services without charge to those patients, and the money available from all other sources is added, every dollar we give is multiplied nine times over in free service to those who need help.

It is a high privilege for us in our churches to minister in the name of the Great Physician, through our hospital, to these multitudes who are sick. It will be a welcome voice when the King shall come in His glory and we can hear Him say: "Come, ye blessed of my Father; for I was sick, and ye visited me."

LIBRARY REPORT

In every active, progressive Baptist church there are calls for materials to meet the needs of individual members and to supplement the activities of the educational program.

Therefore, believing that the Church Library is a lasting ministry, we have based our associational program meetings this year on: Technical Knowledge, Promotion and Caring for Materials.

In our class in the Central Training School we studied "How to Get Started." Our enrollment was 11 with 9 churches represented and 8 members receiving awards for "A Church Organized and Functioning." For our May meeting, the Library Staff of Florence Church presented a skit, "No Room." We had 15 present and 6 churches represented. In August Mr. Frederic M. Marble, a representative of Gaylord Bros. Inc. gave a two hour workshop on book mending, with 10 present and 5 churches represented.

To help churches establish a resource center, the Baptist Sunday School Board, with assistance from other convention agencies, offers Free Library Material to each Southern Baptist Church or Mission, beginning a Library for the first time. The N. C. Baptist State Convention has appointed Dr. Herman H. Ihley as the contact person for Church Libraries in our state.

The Church Library Organization of the Sandy Run Baptist Association is organized to serve even the smallest church. We cannot do our best service without your help. Harold E. Ingraham says, and we quote: "No movement — that's right — no movement ever gained the attention of even the majority of our churches unless it went through the association."

SOUTH MOUNTAIN BAPTIST CAMP REPORT

South Mountain Baptist Camp continues to bless the lives of the great numbers who attended her various activities. Hundreds of campers had a rich and deeper experience with God and learned a lot about our church work.

There were five GA camps with 831 attending; four RA camps with 417 attending; 243 campers who received honor camper awards, and 630 earned the Star camper award. To receive these honors, the campers must study on Forward Steps or Manual study. Also, it is necessary to read a mission book. There were eight missionaries on the camp programs this summer.

There was a total of 2,030 who attended the various activities during this season. We had an increased number of youth retreats, overnight camps, and supper meetings. Campers came from 111 churches. 135 attended from our Association from 7 churches.

The theme for the summer was "Christ, The Hope of the World" (Col. 1:27). 739 were inspired to make some kind of decision for Christ. 95 professions of faith, 605 rededications and 39 for special services.

For years crushed ice has been hauled in at the camp. Members of the camp committee authorized the purchase of an ice maker. We have the faith that enough individuals and churches will make donations to pay for it. It is a 200 lbs. capacity. The cost was \$714.00 installed. Donations have taken care of over \$400.00, and we have saved on the price of ice.

We are happy to report that the camp received an "A" rating from the North Carolina Health Department.

Even though the Camp fees are unusually low for the campers, we have been operating on the money received from them. We received approximately \$3,000.00 over and above our seasonal expenses which is applied to the salary of the camp director who is employed the year round. We look to the churches for about \$1,000.00 of his salary. He is available to help promote camping anywhere in Region Eight. Most of the money received from the churches is used for development and improvements, and to pay on the indebtedness. The debt to Mr. B. H. Poteat of Morganton is \$2,5000.00.

Our Association has sought to help our local churches by promoting the "Stewardship Development Program for Baptist Associations." It utilizes the associational unit to reach every church with (1) methods to increase the church budget, (2) challenges to increase the Co-operative Program, and (3) incentive to support adequately the associational mission program.

We had an Associational Stewardship Workshop at the Florence Church last July. Rev. Ottis J. Hagler and Rev. Harold White of our State leadership led the conference. We were reminded again (1) of our accountability unto God for all that we are and have, (2) that liberal giving must begin with the tithe, and (3) the church is the primary channel for our giving.

The Tithe Now! Campaign was emphasized. This program is of tremendous importance. Baptists across our land are giving to the Lord's work barely one-third of the tithe potential. This is based on resident church member figures rather than per capita giving.

The Leadership Supper in August was a wonderful success. The purpose of this supper was to help us and our churches promote and strengthen the Kingdom of God through our financial stewardship. One of the highlights of the evening was the stewardship testimonies by Christian laymen.

Brother Sam Hargett has ready a number of teams of men to visit our churches upon invitation on Sunday mornings to present stewardship information and bear stewardship testimonies. We hope that you will invite these men to your church.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the churches participate in the Tithes Now! Emphasis.
2. The Forward Program of Christian Stewardship and the Growth in Christian Stewardship programs are now available to churches in our association. The Forward Program is for all churches. The Growth in Christian Stewardship Program has been designed especially for churches up to three hundred in membership. We urge every church in our association to use one of these two programs in developing Christian stewards and enlisting tithers.
3. That we engage regularly in prayer for cooperative causes and give special emphasis to prayer for these causes during the October Cooperative Program Emphasis.
4. That the churches give regularly through the Cooperative Program. We are witnessing our greatest advance in history with 52.27% of the southwide Cooperative Program dollar being allocated to Foreign Missions.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

This has been the year of the Adult Thrust in Sunday School work. There are some of the churches in our association that have been making an effort to implement this plan of strategy. The idea of the Adult Thrust is one of necessity not of fancy. The most necessary task that we have in the enlisting of the great host of unenlisted adults in our communities for Bible study and commitment to Jesus Christ. It is a definite area in which we need to carry out our marching orders of The Great Commission.

The Sunday Schools of our churches have been assigned the tasks of teaching the Bible, reaching the unreached, leading all church members to worship, witness, learn, and minister daily, furnishing workers for various projects, and interpreting the work of the church and denomination. So the Sunday School is important to the church in its basic functions of worship, proclamation, education and ministry.

The goal for our Southern Baptist Sunday Schools as far as enrolment is concerned is ten million pupils by 1970. This means that we must have an enrolment gain of approximately 30% in the next five years. Here in North Carolina our goal is 1 million by 1970. In order to do this we must give outreach priority.

Let us in Sandy Run Association accept a net enrolment increase of 3% for 1966, 4% for 1967, 5% for 1968, 6% for 1969, and 7% for 1970. We will grow great Sunday Schools as we show compassionate concern for the unreached. Evangelism, stewardship, missions, discipleship — all are waiting upon outreach.

Dr. Arthur Flake many years ago advocated a simple growth formula. First, locate the prospects. Then enlarge the organizations. Then provide needed space. Then enlist and train workers, and visit the people. If every Sunday School would follow this formula, we would reach more people for Bible study; our baptism would increase; Christian stewardship will become a reality and our churches would be strengthened.

If your church does not observe January Bible Study Week, why not try it this year? Plan to have a full ten days of Vacation Bible School and a mission Vacation Bible School. Plan an adequate program of training for your workers this year. Get a copy of Adult Thrust Plan Book, Year 2 and see how interesting this plan of work really is. Plan to attend Associational conferences and Sunday School weeks at Caswell and Ridgecrest. As the Sunday School advances the church will advance too.

The Sunday Schools in the association reported a total enrolment of 14,497 as compared with 14,965 in 1964.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

Our year began with the organization of two new WMS groups at Wilson and Fairview churches, organized under the WMS Plan for Societies without Circles. During the year we have had 2 new GA organizations and one new Sunbeam and YWA organization.

Our Executive Board members taught the Leadership Courses for WMS, YWA, and GA's February 1-4 in the Associational Central Training School at First Baptist Church, Forest City.

Mrs. Lorena Hicks, Mission Study Chairman, conducted a Mission Study Institute, January 21 for those who were to teach the Home Mission Series of books. Several teachers presented the helps for teaching the five books for the different age groups. Mrs. Hicks planned for the study of "My Money and God" to be taught in each of our four groups of churches. These classes were held at Shiloh, Concord, Goode's Creek and Race Path Churches on July 29 and attended by 225 people. In addition to this, Mrs. Hicks has the opportunity to teach 396 people in 16 classes in various churches in the association. In some of these 2 or 3 churches came

together to study. We feel that our people are being well informed of mission needs and opportunities.

In our Community Missions works, Mrs. Eugene Wilson, chairman, arranged a Literacy Workshop at Florence Church February 22-23 where eight people completed the course and qualified as teachers of the Lau-back Method. A small library has been started at the prison farm, through the cooperation of several of our WMS's in providing books. A ministry to the girls at Alexander School has been a part of our associational work with various churches taking one or more girls as their special responsibility.

Mrs. W. A. Stroud, Prayer Chairman, planned the Associational WMU Prayer Retreat held August 23rd at Haynes Memorial Church. We were fortunate to have Miss Bertha Smith to lead this. We feel that the 16 churches represented by 65 people who attended will be blessed as never before if each church would form a prayer group to pray together regularly for specific needs or problems in their churches.

Our Stewardship Chairman, Mrs. Van Carroll, has reminded us through the year of our need to be better stewards as she has promoted the special offerings, helped with the teaching of the stewardship book, and presented the skit, "The Money Cake," at the Annual WMU meeting on April 29 at Prospect Church. Camp's Creek WMU assisted in entertaining the 250 who attended the Annual Session. Thirty-four of our forty-eight societies were represented. Guest speakers were Mrs. Woodrow Daves, Gaston Association; Mr. and Mrs. Sam Young, summer missionaries in California under the Home Mission Board; Mrs. Louise Burgess, State Sunbeam Director; and Miss Bertha Smith, Missionary in China and Taiwan.

Our YWA Annual Meeting was a prayer retreat this year planned by Mrs. Charles Bostic, YWA Director. This was at Mt. Pleasant (C) Church, May 8th, with Miss Fay Tunmire, missionary in the Philippines, as guest speaker.

Mrs. Audley Hamrick, newly elected Sunbeam Director, began her term of service by having a Sunbeam Day Camp at Drewery Dobbins Church, August 5th. Miss Bertie Lee Kendrick, missionary in Hawaii, was our missionary for the day. The children enjoyed her slides and stories of boys and girls she teaches in Hawaii. Members of the WMU Executive Board assisted with the hand craft, stories, and drama. Several of the YWA's and one RA helped with the groups and songs and recreation.

Three Hundred and Sixty GA's attended the GA's World's Fair, May 1st at the First Baptist Church, Forest City. Mrs. Elwood R. Orr, GA Director, used the theme, "Go ye therefore into all the world . . . That the world through H m might be saved." Exhibits of curios and maps from countries around the world were arranged in four areas of the church for tours following the program in the sanctuary. Afterwards, a fun time was enjoyed in the social hall and the meeting was concluded with a picnic lunch.

Members of the WMU Executive Board attended the State Human Relations Conference, February 25 in Winston-Salem and the State WMU Annual Session in Greensboro, March 16-18. Mrs. Audley Hamrick and Mrs. J. E. Marchman attended the State Sunbeam Day Camp Clinic in Marion, April 28. Five members of the board were at Ridge-

crest, August 12-18 for the WMU Conference. Mrs. Van Carroll, Mrs. Elwood Orr and Mrs. J. F. Marchman went to Miami, Florida, June 25-30 to the Baptist World Congress.
