The next Session of the Sandy Run Association will be held at Forest City on Thursday before the second Sunday in November 1891.

PROCEEDINGS.

THURSDAY, Nov. 27th, 1890.

According to appointment the churches hereinafter named, by their representatives, met at Bethel Baptist Church, Ellenboro, N. C., on Thursday the 27th of November 1890, for the purpose of organizing a New Association.

Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. G. W. Rollins.

Recess for one hour was then taken.

The representatives or Delegates from the various churches reassembled.

Rev. Z. D. Harrill, pastor of Bethel church, explained the object to be the formation of a New Association.

Rev. G. W. Rollins, was upon motion, made temporary Moderator, and Matt McBrayer temporary Clerk.

The body was called to order by the Moderator; and brethren E. H. Byers and Lee W. Lynch requested to act as reading Clerks.

The churches desiring the Constitution of a new Association were called, and the following named presented letters of dismission from other Associations and letters from their respective churches, which were read and names of messengers enrolled, namely: -

It was then announced by the Moderator that the election of permanent officers was next in order.

On motion of Rev. T. Bright, Rev. G. W. Rollins was elected Moderator by acclamation, Matt McBrayer Clerk and E. H. Byers Treasurer.

It was then suggested that the New Association should be named, whereupon, after quite a number of names had been offered as appropriate, it was decided by a rising vote that it should be called "The Sandy Run Baptist Association."

On motion, the Constitution, Order of Business and Rules of Decorum adopted at the last session of the King's Mountain Association, were temporarily adopted by this body, with some amendments, all of which appear in these minutes.

The Moderator extended invitations to corresponding messengers and visiting ministers, when the following presented themselves and were cordially received and enrolled:

Revs. T. Dixon, A. C. Irvin, J. M. Bridges, E. J. Bridges, R. N. Hawkins presented themselves as visiting brethren from the King's Mountain Association, and were likewise warmly received in behalf of the Association.

On motion the Association adjourned to meet tomorrow morning at 9:30 o'clock.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 28TH, 1890.

The Association convened at 9:30 o'clock a. m. Opening services conducted by Rev. C. Durham.

Proceedings of yesterday read and approved.

Reports of committees requested.

Rev. C. Durham offered the following report:

We have at Thomasville 300 acres of land, 12 brick buildings, two others in process of construction, and 130 children fed, clothed and taught and a weekly paper, Charity and Children with a growing circulation, published at one dollar a year. These children deserve our sympathy and aid in this their time of need. The Trustees ask every Pastor to tell his churches, once a year, about the Orphanage and give them an opportunity to aid them. They ask also, that the children in the Sunday Schools be properly informed about this work, and give them an opportunity to contribute.

The Lord has commanded his people to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature, and it is our duty to obey. The command comes to us in these latter days with increasing power. The number of brethren and sisters from the Baptist Churches of North Carolina now in the foreign field should stimulate us to greater sacrifices than ever before. Our Foreign Missions in each of the six great fields occupied, Italy, Africa, China, Japan, Mexico and South America, have been greatly blessed of the Lord. Let us sustain this work liberally.

Your Committee on State Missions report as follows: The Board of Missions has 104 Missionaries employed, and still there is room to enlarge the work. There are seven Associations connected with the Board who have no one employed to labor among them. Brethren, let us press onward in this grand work. Our success in foreign lands depends largely upon development at home.

After one hour's recess the Association re-assembles.

A preamble to the Constitution was offered as follows :

We the United Baptist Churches of Jesus Christ, located partly in Cleveland and Rutherford counties, N. C., having all been immersed upon a profession of faith in Christ and having obtained letters of dismission from the King's Mountain and Green River Associations, propose to maintain the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan :

ARTICLE 1st. This Association shall be known by the name of the Sandy Run Association

All pastors of churches belonging to this Association shall be ex officio members of the body.

Committee on Home and Indian Missions :

This department of our work is under the supervision of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. This Board has in its employ over 300 Missionaries. These Missionaries are preaching in destitute sections in the Southern States, also among the Indians in the Territories and in Cuba.

The Lord has in a most signal manner blessed this department of our work. This work is supported by the contributions of the Baptist churches and friends of the work.

Resolved, Therefore, that we are in sympathy with this work and that we will co-operate with the Board in carrying forward this part of the Lord's work, and would therefore advise that one member be appointed from each church. Said appointments to be made by the pastors. The member so appointed see that at least one collection shall be taken during the year for this Board.

We believe that it is the duty of the deacons of our churches to see that their pastors are well sustained, and if they do, we think the Baptists can take the State of North Carolina for Christ.

The Committee on Education, through J. M. Goode, makes the following report :

We are glad to say that we believe the cause of Education is fast advancing. Higher and better schools are being built all over the country, and there seems to be a growing interest in the

people with reference to it. Yet we are sorry to say that our people are not half as much aroused on the subject of Education as they ought to be. To realize the great importance of the training of the mind, and then to see how little so many people attach to it is really appalling.

My people are destroyed said God for lack of knowledge, "Because thou hast rejected knowledge I will also reject thee."—Hosea, iv:6.

Our own beloved Wake Forest College which has done, and is doing so much for the denomination deserves our highest esteem and hearty support. Notwithstanding the large work and usefulness of the College at present, it is not grown. Its increasing work and usefulness necessitate additional endowment funds, and successful efforts for which are now being made and should receive our hearty support.

None the less in importance is our Theological Seminary, at Louisville, which has already made herself felt in our land, and should likewise receive our support. But nothing speaks in louder terms of the advancement of the cause of Education than does the efforts which are being made to establish a Female University, which we heartily recommend to Baptists everywhere.

On motion the Moderator appoints a committee consisting of T. Bright, W. B. Lovelace, Z. D. Harrill and Matt McBrayer to prepare a Constitution, Abstract of Principles and Rules of Decorum for this Association and report at its next annual session.

Minute funds amounting to 18.15 paid to the Clerk.

Committee on Time and Place reports :

That the next session of this Association be held with the Forest City church on Thursday before the 4th Sunday in September 1891; and that Rev. A. P. Hollifield preach the Introductory Sermon.

The report on motion of T. Bright was amended as to Time, by substituting "Thursday before the 2nd Sunday in November" for "Thursday before the 4th Sunday in September," and thus amended the report was adopted.

On motion, any member of this Association visiting the King's Mountain or Green River, or any other Association was authorized and empowered to represent us in such Associations.

Resolution offered by T. Bright and adopted as follows :

Resolved, That Bethel Church and the community have the hearty thanks for the hospitable manner in which the Association has been entertained and we only regret that the session was so short.

The proceedings of the session read and approved.

After prayer by Rev. C. Durham, the Association adjourned to meet with the Forest City Church on Thursday before the 2nd Sunday in November 1891.

Constitution of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

We the united Baptist churches of Jesus Christ, located partly in Cleveland and Rutherford counties, N. C., having all been immersed upon a profession of our faith in Christ and having obtained letters of dismission from the King's Mountain and Green River Associations propose to maintain the order and rules of our Association according to the following plan :

ARTICLE 1st. This Association shall be known by the name of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

2nd This Association shall be composed of such members as shall be chosen and recommended by the churches in union. Provided, that all pastors of churches belonging to this Association shall be ex officio members of the body, with full right and privileges of chosen lay members.

3rd. Other churches may become members of this Association, by their delegates presenting certificates of their appointment, provided on examination they be found orthodox.

4th. The Association shall organize by electing a Moderator and Clerk, who shall hold their appointments until another election, unless displaced by the body.

5th. This Association, as an act of christian courtesy, may invite ministers of our denomination to seats with us in council.

6th. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum, which they are authorized to form for themselves.

7th. This Association hath an inalienable right to judge what

churches shall be admitted into its confederacy.

8th. The Association thus formed shall be regarded by us only in the light of an advisory council, with no coercive power "to lord it over God's heritage."

9th This Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in its connection that shall hold corrupt doctrines or indulge in sinful or vicious practices.

10th. Every church in union having a membership not exceeding fifty in number, shall be entitled to a representation of two delegates, and one additional delegate for every increase of fifty over that number.

11th. The primary object of this Association shall be "to strive for the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace" amongst the churches, the employment of domestic missionaries, and to keep up the statistical accounts of the churches in its connection. and, finally, to concentrate our efforts for the Redeemer's kingdom on earth, and for the deposition of the works of darkness.

12th. None but the members of this body shall be allowed to vote in its councils, and a majority shall decide in disposing of and settling all business that may constitutionally come before them.

13th. This Association in all cases disclaims the right, in its associate capacity, to settle church difficulties, but when a division occurs and two parties equally claim to be the church and represent themselves by letter and delegates, this Association shall have the right to decide at the first or some future meeting of its body thereafter, which party shall be recognized as the constitutional church, and entitled to a seat in council.

14th. The minutes of the Association shall be read each day and corrected, if need be by the body, and when the business shall be gone through with, signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.

15th. Any article of this Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, by a majority of two-thirds of the delegates present voting for the same.

Abstract of Principles.

1. We believe in one only true and living God—the Father, Son and Holy Ghost—three in one.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only true rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

4. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, by his own free will and holiness.

5. We believe in the doctrine of Election, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the Truth.

6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the merit of Jesus Christ.

7. We believe the saints shall persevere in grace, and not fall finally away.

8. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers who have been immersed upon a profession of faith are the only proper subjects for the Lord's table.

9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and general judgment.

10. We believe that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

11. We believe that no minister has a right to the administration of the ordinances, only such as has been called of God, as was Aaron, and regularly baptized and approved of by the church, and come under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery.

Rules of Decorum.

1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. The Moderator shall be deemed a judge of order, and shall have a right to call to order at any time; also it shall be his duty to see that the Rules of Order are attended to; to take the opinion of the Association on all questions properly brought before the body.

3. Any member not being satisfied with his decision on any point of order, may appeal to the Association on the same day the decision is made, but at no other time.

4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular record of the transactions of the Association.

5. But one person shall speak at a time, and he shall rise to his feet and obtain leave of the Moderator, and when he has done speaking he shall sit down, and shall not speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than twenty minutes at a time, unless he obtains permission of the Association.

6. The Moderator, when addressed for leave of speech, shall signify the same by naming of them, or otherwise.

7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject on hand, or use words of personal reflection, or with a view of calling to order for some particular purpose. Any motion made and seconded, shall come under the consideration of the Association, except withdrawn by him who made it.

8. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided first, before another is offered.

9. When anything is taken up by the Association, after allowing time for the debate, the Moderator shall put the question; and those in favor of the thing proposed shall rise to their feet, and those opposed to it shall keep their seats; the Moderator shall procure the decision before those standing take their seats.

10. No person being a member shall depart the service of the Association without leave.

11. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in our addresses to each other.

12. The names of the members shall be called as often as necessary.

13. No member shall be indulged in any practice that has a tendency to interrupt in the time of a public speech, or any other practice that would dishonor the Association.

14. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any other member, provided he appoints some other member to his seat while he is speaking, but shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he shall give the casting vote.

15. Any person breaking these rules of order shall be reprovved at the discretion of the Association, but only on the day the breach was made.

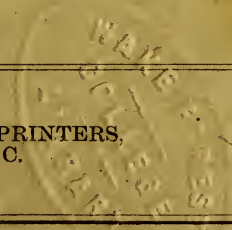

There are now 126 orphans in the Orphanage at Thomasville—all dependent on the voluntary contributions of the Baptists of North Carolina. The work we do for these children we do for Christ, for He said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of these least, ye have done it unto me." The Spirit said through the epistle James: "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this: "to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep him unspotted from the world." The Orphanage is the property of the Baptists of the State, and relies on them for its support. Its operations must be limited by the contributions received. The orphans of your dead brethren and sisters are your nephews and neices in the gospel. Do for them as you would like to have others do for your children, in case of death.

We recommend that each church in this Association take one collection a year, and the Sunday schools take quarterly collections, for the orphans. In this way the institution will not suffer at any season of the year.

The obligation to do this work is great, and the facilities and encouragements to this work are abundant. It remains for us to say whether or not we will disregard the obligation, throw away these facilities in spite of these encouragements. God help us to do our duty.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Before our Divine leader and commander left the earth and went to the throne of Heaven, He gave to His people the command to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. The spirit of Missions is the spirit of Christ. "If any man has not the spirit of Christ he is none of His." Brethren and sisters, let us go forward in obedience to the command of our Divine King. God our Savior chose Wm. Carey, about one hundred years ago, to revive the work of missions and sent him to India, and soon after He converted Adonirom Judson to Baptist views and sent him to Birmah, and afterwards He called Mathew T Gates and sent him to China; and more recently raised up Diaz as an apostle to Cuba, and has called, besides those from other states, from our own state about twenty-eight men and women to labor in foreign lands; and, though Baptists give only one-seventh of the funds and have only about one-seventh of the laborers in the foreign mission field, yet He has given them more converts than to all other denominations combined. These facts appeal loudly to our people to give more liberally to carry out the command of the Lord and pray earnestly for success. We call attention to the fact that next year is the centennial year of Missions, and the Southern Baptist Convention has determined to raise two hundred and fifty thousand dollars for foreign missions, and to send out a re-enforcement of one hundred men and women. In view of this we recommend that our churches raise two hundred and fifty dollars for foreign missions.

We notice by the reading of the letters that our churches are not all asleep on this important subject. The word of the Lord teaches very clearly our duty to give of our natural substance to the support of the men of God who ministers to us spiritual things.

We suggest that all our churches loose the hands of their pastors as much as possible, that they may give themselves wholly to the work.

Constitution of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

We, the united Baptist churches of Jesus Christ, located in Cleveland and Rutherford counties, in the State of North Carolina, having all been immersed upon a profession of our faith in Christ, and having obtained letters of dismission from the King's Mountain and Green River Associations, propose to maintain the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan :

ARTICLE 1st. This Association shall be known by the name of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

2nd. This Association shall be composed of such members as shall be chosen and recommended by the churches in union.

3rd. Other churches may become members of this Association by their delegates presenting certificates of their appointment, provided on examination they may be found orthodox.

4th. The Association shall organize by electing, by ballot, a Moderator and Clerk, who shall hold their appointments one associational year, and until their successors are elected, unless displaced by the Body.

5th. This Association, as an act of christian courtesy, may invite ministers of our denomination to seats with us in council.

6th. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum which the Body is authorized to form for itself.

7th. This Association hath an inalienable right to judge what churches shall be admitted into its confederacy.

8th. The Association, thus formed, shall be regarded by us, only in the light of an advisory council, with no coercive power to "Lord it over God's heritage."

9th. This Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in its connection that shall hold corrupt doctrines or indulge in sinful or vicious practices.

10th. Every church in union, having a membership not exceeding fifty in number, shall be entitled to a representation of two delegates, and one additional delegate for every increase of fifty over that number.

11th. The primary object of this Association shall be to strive for the unity of the spirit in the bonds of peace among the churches, the employment of missionaries, and to keep up the statistical accounts of the churches in its connection and, finally, to concentrate our efforts for the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth, and for the deposition of the works of darkness.

12th. None but the members of this body shall be allowed to vote in its councils, and a majority shall decide in disposing of and settling all business that may constitutionally come before them.

13th. This Association in all cases disclaims the right, in its associate capacity, to settle church difficulties, but when a division occurs and two parties equally claim to be the church and represent themselves by letter and delegate, this Association shall have the right to decide, at the first or some future meeting of its body thereafter, which party, if either, shall be recognized as the constitutional church and entitled to a seat in council.

14th. The minutes of the Association shall be read each day and corrected, if need be, by the Body, and when the business shall have been completed, signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.

15th. Any Article of this Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, by a majority of two-thirds of the delegates present voting for the same.

Abstract of Principles.

- 1st, We believe in one only true and living God,—the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost—three in one.
- 2nd, We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only true rule of faith and practice.
- 3rd, We believe in the doctrine of original sin.
- 4th, We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, by his own free will and holiness.
- 5th, We believe in the doctrine of election, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the Truth.
- 6th, We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the merit of Jesus Christ.
- 7th, We believe the saints shall persevere in grace and not fall finally away.
- 8th, We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers, who have been immersed upon a profession of faith, are the only proper subjects for the Lord's table.
- 9th, We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and general judgment.
- 10th, We believe that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
- 11th, We believe that no minister has a right to the administration of the ordinances, only such as have been called of God, as was Aaron, and regularly baptized and approved of by the church and come under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery.
- 12th, We believe that no Presbytery is complete without two or more ordained ministers.

Rules of Decorum.

- 1st. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- 2nd. The Moderator shall be deemed a judge of order, and shall have a right to call to order at any time; also it shall be his duty to see that the Rules of Order are attended to—to take the opinion of the Association on all questions properly brought before the Body.
- 3rd, Any member not being satisfied with his decision on any point of order, may appeal to the Association on the same day the decision is made, but at no other time.
- 4th. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular record of the transactions of the Association.
- 5th. But one person shall speak at a time, and he shall rise to his feet and obtain leave of the Moderator, and when he has done speaking he shall sit down and shall not speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than twenty minutes, at a time, unless he obtains permission of the Association.
- 6th. The Moderator, when addressed for leave of speech, shall signify the same by naming of them or otherwise.
- 7th. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject on hand, or use words of personal reflection, or with a view of calling to order for some particular purpose. Any motion made and seconded, shall come under the consideration of the Association, except it be withdrawn by him who made it.
- 8th. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided before another is offered.
- 9th. When anything is taken up by the Association, after allowing time for the debate, the Moderator shall put the question; and those in favor of the thing proposed shall rise to their feet, and those opposed to it shall keep their seats; the Moderator shall procure the decision before those standing take their seats.
- 10th. No person being a member shall depart the Association without leave of the Moderator.

11th. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in our addresses to each other.

12th. The names of the members shall be called as often as necessary.

13th. No member shall be indulged in any practice that has a tendency to interrupt in the time of a public speech, or any other practice that would dishonor the Association.

14th. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any other member, provided he appoints some other member to his seat while he is speaking, but shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the casting vote.

15th. Any member breaking these rules of order, shall be reprovved at the discretion of the Association, but only on the day the breach is made.

Constitution of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

We, the united Baptist churches of Jesus Christ, located in Cleveland and Rutherford counties, in the State of North Carolina, having all been immersed upon a profession of our faith in Christ, and having obtained letters of dismission from the King's Mountain and Green River Associations, propose to maintain the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan :

ARTICLE 1st. This Association shall be known by the name of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

2nd. This Association shall be composed of such members as shall be chosen and recommended by the churches in union.

3rd. Other churches may become members of this Association by their delegates presenting certificates of their appointment, provided on examination they may be found orthodox.

4th. The Association shall organize by electing, by ballot, a Moderator and Clerk, who shall hold their appointments one associational year, and until their successors are elected, unless displaced by the Body.

5th. This Association, as an act of christian courtesy, may invite ministers of our denomination to seats with us in council.

6th. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum which the Body is authorized to form for itself.

7th. This Association hath an inalienable right to judge what churches shall be admitted into its confederacy.

8th. The Association, thus formed, shall be regarded by us, only in the light of an advisory council, with no coercive power to "Lord it over God's heritage."

9th. This Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in its connection that shall hold corrupt doctrines or indulge in sinful or vicious practices.

10th. Every church in union, having a membership not exceeding fifty in number, shall be entitled to a representation of two delegates, and one additional delegate for every increase of fifty over that number.

11th. The primary object of this Association shall be to strive for the unity of the spirit in the bonds of peace among the churches, the employment of missionaries, and to keep up the statistical accounts of the churches in its connection and, finally, to concentrate our efforts for the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth, and for the deposition of the works of darknesss.

12th. None but the members of this body shall be allowed to vote in its councils, and a majority shall decide in disposing of and settling all business that may constitutionally come before them.

13th. This Association in all cases disclaims the right, in its associate capacity, to settle church difficulties, but when a division occurs and two parties equally claim to be the church and represent themselves by letter and delegate, this Association shall have the right to decide at the first or some future meeting of its body thereafter, which party, if either, shall be recognized as the constitutional church and entitled to a seat in council.

14th The minutes of the Association shall be read each day and cor-

rected, if need be, by the body, and when the business shall have been completed, signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.

15th. Any Article of this Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, by a majority of two-thirds of the delegates present voting for the same.

Rules of Decorum.

1st. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2d. The Moderator shall be deemed a judge of order, and shall have a right to call to order at any time; also it shall be his duty to see that the Rules of Order are attended to—to take the opinion of the Association on all questions properly brought before the Body.

3d. Any member not being satisfied with his decision on any point of order, may appeal to the Association on the same day the decision is made, but at no other time.

4th. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular record of the transactions of the Association.

5th. But one person shall speak at a time, and he shall rise to his feet and obtain leave of the Moderator, and when he has done speaking he shall sit down and shall not speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than twenty minutes at a time, unless he obtains permission of the Association,

6th. The Moderator, when addressed for leave of speech, shall signify the same, by naming of them or otherwise.

7th. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject on hand, or use words of personal reflection, or with a view of calling to order for some particular purpose. Any motion made and seconded, shall come under the consideration of the Association, except it be withdrawn by him who made it.

8th. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided before another is offered.

9th. When anything is taken up by the Association, after allowing time for the debate, the Moderator shall put the question; and those in favor of the thing proposed, shall rise to their feet; and those opposed to it shall keep their seats. The Moderator shall procure the decision before those standing take their seats.

10th. No person being a member shall depart the Association without leave of the Moderator.

11th. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in our addresses to each other,

12th. The names of the members shall be called as often as necessary.

13th. No member shall be indulged in any practice that has a tendency to interrupt in the time of a public speech, or any other practice that would dishonor the Association.

14th. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any other member, provided he appoints some other member to his seat while he is speaking, but shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the casting vote.

15th. Any member breaking these rules of order, shall be reprov'd at the discretion of the Association, but only on the day the breach is made.

Abstract of Principles.

1st. We believe in the only true and living God,—the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost—three in one.

2nd. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only true rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

4th. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, by his own free will and holiness.

5th. We believe in the doctrine of election, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the Truth.

6th. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the merit of Jesus Christ.

7th. We believe the saints shall persevere in grace and not fall finally away.

8th. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers who have been immersed upon a profession of faith, are the only proper subjects for the Lord's table.

9th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and general judgment.

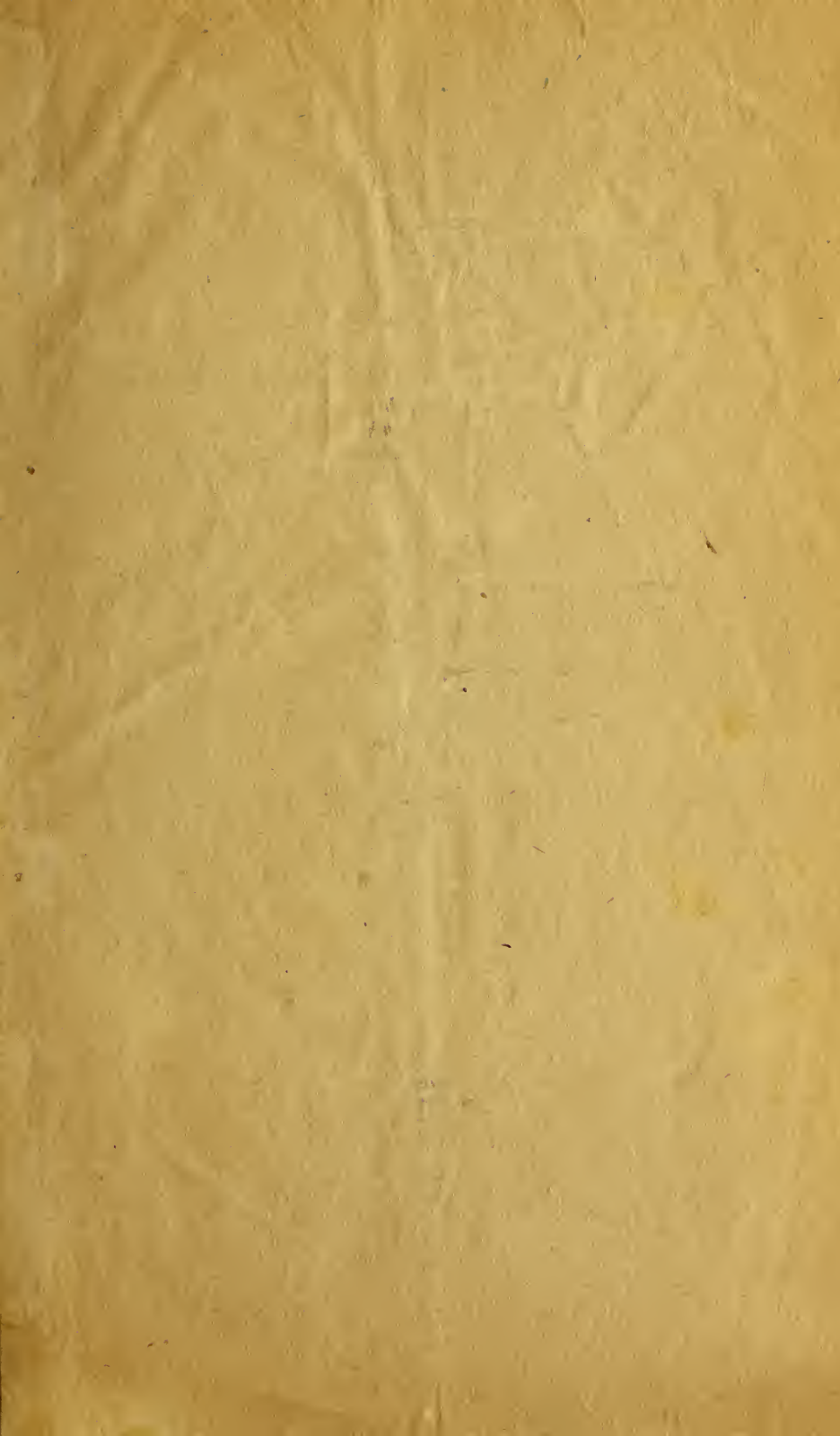
10th. We believe that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

11th. We believe that no minister has a right to the administration of the ordinances, only such as have been called of God, as was Aaron, and regularly baptized and approved of by the church and come under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery.

12th. We believe that no Presbytery is complete without two or more ordained ministers.

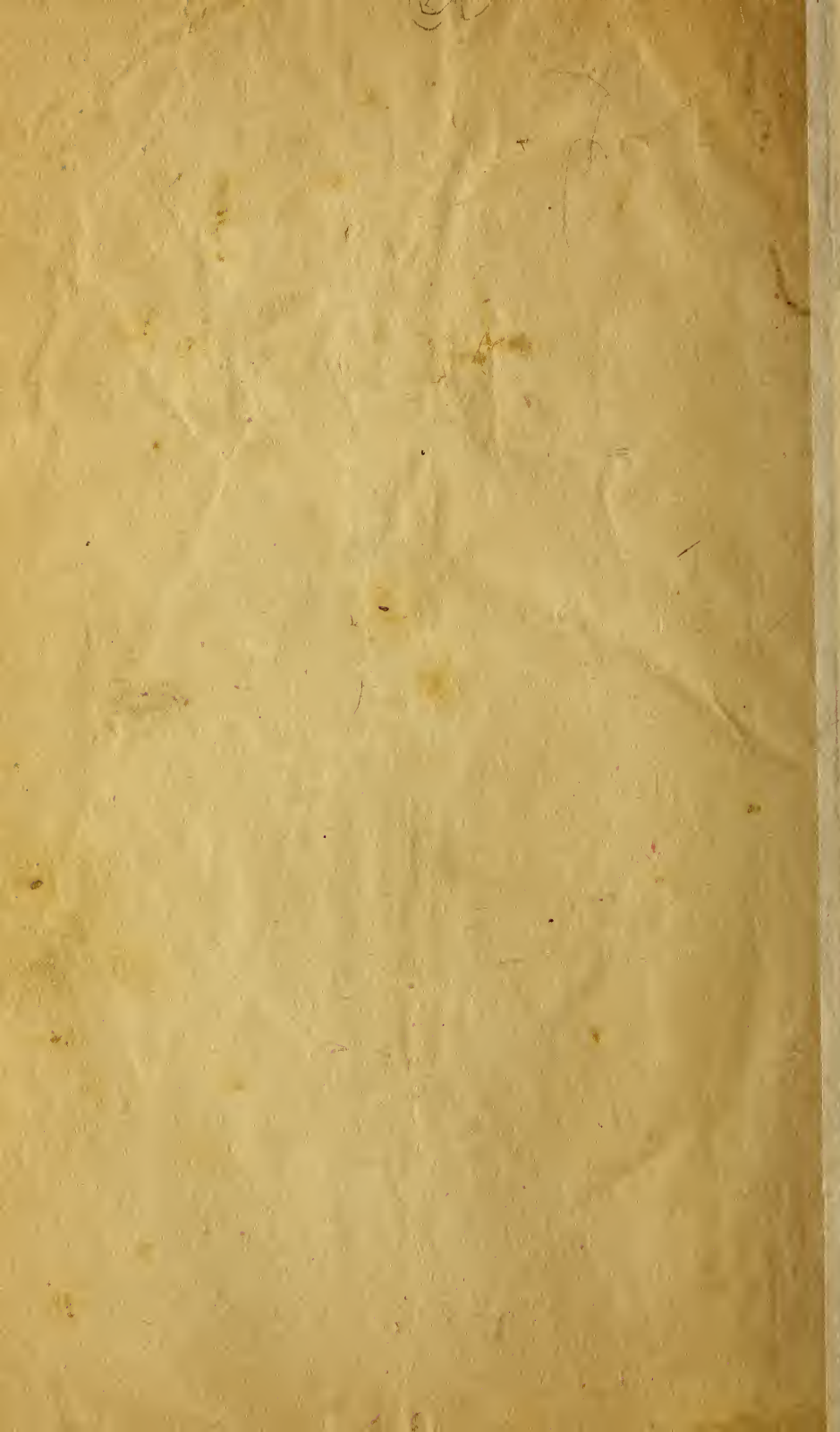

Report on Home Missions was read by Elder Z. D. Harrill:

HOME MISSIONS:

While we neglect all the objects of this body more than we should, there is none neglected more than Home Missions. This ought not to be so. When we consider the importance of the work of the Home Mission Board, we feel to urge every one to a greater effort to aid this good work. We do not know enough of the Home Mission work to stir us up to our duty. If our people would read the Home Field, it would give them such information as would greatly increase their interest on this subject, and becoming interested they would largely increase their contributions. The Home Field only costs twenty-five cents and comes monthly. We hope all the delegates will subscribe for this paper while here, and then go home and make a club in every church belonging to this Association. We can not be interested in a thing of which we know nothing, but if

we will read and inform ourselves upon the work of Home Missions, our prayers will increase and our contributions accordingly.

According to a statement made by F. C. McDowell, Assistant Secretary of the Home Mission Board, there are fifty counties that compose the mountain region of this field. This mountain region belongs to four states—North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Tennessee. In this region there are about four hundred thousand people. Of this number about seventy-five thousand are Baptists; but for the lack of preachers and the proper time and education, they have not been taught the doctrines of the Bible as they should. The Home Mission board of the Southern Baptist Convention will supply this field with good workers if they can get the means. Let us, the Sandy Run Association, come with our part and the Lord will bless us in this duty.

The Sunday Schools may do much to build up Sunday Schools in destitute sections by patronizing our own Southern Literature. This board is helping to do Missionary work in all the Southern States, Cuba, Indian Territory, and among the colored people.

May the Lord direct every member of this Association to help in this good work.

EDUCATION.

Your Committee are glad to report that in our opinion the spirit of education among our people is progressing rapidly. As an evidence of this the reports of our high schools and colleges show that they are more largely attended than ever before.

Your committee are of the opinion that much remains to be done in the way of a general education. We recommend to our people a careful study of a tract published by Dr. C. E. Taylor entitled "How Far Should a State Undertake to Educate?"

We believe this tract will furnish the much needed information on this subject.

It is the opinion of your committee that our legislators ought to obey fully the requirements of the Constitution of the State of North Carolina in providing for at least four months in the year in every district in every county in the State.

We are further of the opinion that the large appropriations made by our legislators for "higher" education is unjust to the masses; and in behalf of 618,000 children between the ages of 6 and 12 years would request our legislators to appropriate our public funds to public schools instead of to higher education.

We can cheerfully recommend to our people Wake Forest College as the place to educate our boys and especially young men studying for the ministry, and our Female College at Raleigh as the place to educate our girls.

We have two brethren at Wake Forest College now preparing

for the ministry—Brethren Gillespie and Divinny.

We commend these to the support of our Association.

A great many of us know what it is to have children dependent upon us for support. The children at the Orphanage are our children and must be supported by us.

There are now about one hundred and twenty, with the expectation of others soon, that are wholly dependent upon us.

We the Baptists of North Carolina, have said that we would sustain Brother Mills in his effort to care for these children, and we must do so. In all of our co-laborers there is nothing that has a greater tendency to emancipate selfishness than to contribute for the benefit of these little orphan children. If we will contribute liberal-

ly to this cause, it will prepare us to give to all other objects.

We none know how soon some of ours may be left without the care of father and mother. What comfort it affords us to know they can be placed under the care of Father Mills.

Let us wake up to a sense of this special duty, and adopt some systematic plan of raising funds for these children.

We therefore recommend that each church have stated collections for the Orphanage, and that the children in Sunday Schools be allowed and encouraged to have stated collections for the same.

He took the word of God as the man of his council and stood firm upon its teachings. His faithful labors will long be remembered and eternity alone will reveal the jewels garnered for the Master. Let the recording angel unfold the number of prayers to God for the upbuilding of his kingdom, for the lost, sick, troubled, and distressed.

Although his pilgrimage is finished, long will the good seed sown by him live and be cherished in our hearts.

Let us all try to emulate his example and thank God for giving us such a man to lead and guide us in the ways of truth and eternal glory.

On motion, any brother visiting other Associations may be recognized as a Messenger from this body.

Constitution of the Sandy Run Association.

We the united Baptist Churches of Jesus Christ, located in Cleveland and Rutherford counties, in the State of North Carolina, having all been immersed upon a profession of our faith in Christ, and having obtained letters of dismissal from the King's Mountain and Green River Associations, propose to maintain the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan :

ARTICLE 1st. This Association shall be known by the name of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

2nd. This Association shall be composed of such members as shall be chosen and recommended by the churches in union.

3rd. Other churches may become members of this Association by their delegates presenting certificates of their appointment, provided on examination they may be found orthodox.

4th. The Association shall organize by electing, by ballot, a Moderator and Clerk, who shall hold their appointments one associational year, and until their successors are elected, unless displaced by the Body.

5th. This Association, as an act of christian courtesy, may invite ministers of our denomination to seats with us in council.

6th. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum which the Body is authorized to form for itself.

7th. This Association hath an inalienable right to judge what churches shall be admitted into its confederacy.

8th. The Association thus formed, shall be regarded by us, only in the light of an advisory council, with no coercive power to "Lord it over God's heritage."

9th. This Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in its connection that shall hold corrupt doctrines or indulge in sinful or vicious practices.

10th. Every church in union, having a membership not exceeding fifty in number, shall be entitled to a representation of two delegates, and one additional delegate for every increase of fifty over that number.

11. The primary object of this Association shall be to strive for the unity of the spirit in the bonds of peace among the churches, the employment of missionaries, and to keep up the statistical accounts of the churches in its connection. and, finally, to concentrate our efforts for the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth, and for the deposition of the works of darkness.

12th. None but the members of this body shall be allowed to vote in its councils, and a majority shall decide in disposing of and settling all business that may constitutionally come before them.

13th. This Association in all cases disclaims the right, in its associate capacity, to settle church difficulties, but when a division occurs and two parties equally claim to be the church and represent themselves by letter and delegate, this Association shall have the right to decide, at the first or some future meeting of its body thereafter, which party, if either, shall be recognized as the constitutional church and entitled to a seat in council.

14th. The minutes of the Association shall be read each day and corrected, if need be, by the Body, and when the business shall have been completed, assigned by the Moderator, and Clerk before the Association rises.

15th. Any Article of this Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, by a majority of two-thirds of the delegates present voting for the same.

Abstract of Principles.

1st. We believe in one true and only living God—the Father, Son and Holy Ghost—three in one.

2nd. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only true rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

4th. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, by his own free will and holiness.

5th. We believe in the doctrine of election, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief in the Truth.

6th. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the merit of Jesus Christ.

7th. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and not fall finally away.

8th. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers, who have been immersed upon a profession of faith, are the only proper subjects for the Lord's table.

9th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and general judgment.

10th. We believe that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

11th. We believe that no minister has a right to the administration of the ordinances, only such as have been called of God, as was Aaron, and regularly baptized and approved of by the church and come under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery.

12th. We believe that no Presbytery is complete without two or more ordained ministers.

Rules of Decorum.

1st. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2nd. The Moderator shall be deemed a judge of order, and shall have a right to call to order at any time; also it shall be his duty to see that the Rules of Order are attended to—to take the opinion of the Association on all questions properly brought before the Body.

3rd. Any member not being satisfied with his decision on any point of order, may appeal to the Association on the same day the decision is made, but at no other time.

4th. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular record of the transactions of the Association.

5th. But one person shall speak at a time, and he shall rise to his feet and obtain leave of the Moderator, and when he has done speaking he shall sit down and shall not speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than twenty minutes at a time, unless he obtains permission of the Association.

6th. The Moderator, when addressed for leave of speech, shall signify the same by naming them or otherwise.

7th. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject on hand, or use of words of personal reflection, or with a view of calling to order for some particular purpose. Any motion made and seconded, shall come under the consideration of the Association, except it be withdrawn by him who made it.

8th. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided before another is offered.

9th. When anything is taken up by the Association, after allowing time for debate, the Moderator shall put the question; and those in favor of the thing proposed shall rise to their feet, and those opposed to it shall keep their seats; the Moderator shall procure the decision before those standing take their seats.

10th. No person being a member shall depart the Association without leave of the Moderator.

11th. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in our addresses to each other.

12th. The names of the members shall be called as often as necessary.

13th. No member shall be indulged in any practice that has a tendency to interrupt in the time of a public speech, or any other practice that would dishonor the Association.

14th. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any other member, provided he appoints some other member to his seat while he is speaking, but shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the casting vote.

15th. Any member breaking these rules of order, shall be reprobated at the discretion of the Association, but only on the day the breach is made.

Your Committee would therefore recommend a favorable consideration of the now proposed High School to be located at Bostic.

In accordance with appointment of last session, some of us met with the S. S. Convention at Forest City on Saturday before the 5th Sunday in December last, but owing to inclement weather there was not a quorum. We next met with the Convention at Mt. Olivet, where we organized with G. T. Bostic, Chairman, and G. B. Pruett, Secretary. We adjourned to meet with the Convention at Bethel where we would receive propositions for the location of said school. HOME MISSIONS.

No work undertaken by Southern Baptists has borne richer fruit for the kingdom of Christ, or done more for the establishment of truth, than our Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta.

Fifty years ago, when this work was commenced, there were in the Southern States about four hundred thousand Baptists. To-day there are nearly two million. During last year there were employed in our Home Mission work four hundred and eleven missionaries. There were 1,626 stations supplied, 58,041 sermons preached, 5,617 believers baptized, 207 churches constituted, and 146 churches built.

Among the Negroes of the South, among the Indians, in Cuba, in the Western States and Territories, our home missionaries are preaching the gospel.

North Carolina Baptists have never done their duty by this great work. When the war left us stripped and desolate, when we were not able to help ourselves, the Home Mission Board came to our rescue and assisted 21 of our churches, which now are our strongest and most generous churches in North Carolina.

Instead of \$3,000, the 160,000 white Baptists ought to raise more than \$5,000 for this work each year.

F. B. Gaffney read a report of the Committee on Associational School, as follows:

Your committee beg leave to report that we had a meeting and organized by appointing a chairman and secretary. At a later meeting, at Bostic, we found that the grounds and building which the Bostic brethren had expected to donate for the school could not be legally transferred by them, as it had been conveyed to the

County School Board. Therefore we could not reasonably expect them to convey the property, inasmuch as other denominations might at some time offer objections to its becoming a Baptist school. Whereupon the Bostic brethren proposed to donate the grounds and organize a stock company and erect the necessary buildings, but found that it was not practicable for them to raise the amount necessary to erect the buildings as they should be, we therefore beg to submit a report of brother B. H. Bridges, who is at present teaching at Bostic, as a supplement to this report.

The report is as follows:

The necessity for a Graded or High School under Baptist influence in our bounds, to prepare our sons and daughters for college or for usefulness in the several stations in life, is obvious to any thinking mind.

To supply this great necessity there has been some steps taken by this body to establish such a school. The people at Bostic are making arrangements to erect suitable buildings for said school; but, we think, to make this school what it ought to be, that it ought to be referred to such a stock company as would give each church an opportunity of taking stock in said company. The location is healthy, society good, good board cheap, and tuition reasonable; and every other inducement that can be reasonably expected, will be offered to establish a school second to none of like grade.

Said school is to be denominated the Sandy Run Baptist Associational High School, and we take pleasure in recommending it to the favorable consideration of this body.

We hope that a liberal patronage will be extended the said school.

We believe that every Association should be able to point out to their children a school worthy of Baptist patronage, and, until this is done, we ask your patronage for the Bostic school, which is now in session.

We solicit the aid and influence of the ministry and friends of education generally in the taking of stock and furnishing patronage.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

"The glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it, for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it."

When we couple this passage with the last great command of our Lord, "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world," we readily see how the Lord intends that this should come about.

In accordance with this provision of our dear Lord, he has called laborers into the fields, and they are equipped for the work and trying to execute the Lord's commands, but from some hindering cause those of us who are at home are allowing our contributions to grow less and the treasury of the Board to become exhausted. By this we are not only refusing to send out those who feel that they are called of God into the work, but we are allowing others who are anxious to remain on their fields of labor, and who are successful in their labors, to return to their homes.

We feel that this Association is not contributing anything like the amount of money which it is our privilege to contribute, especially so on the part of some of our churches. This failure to contribute, we think, is due to several causes, viz: Want of knowledge of the mission fields, want of the understanding of God's command, lack of prayer for God's guidance in the use of the means he has given us, lack of earnest work on the part of pastors and deacons in putting these facts forcibly and judiciously before these churches.

We would recommend that the delegates make it their duty to assist their pastors in this work. If the pastor fails from any cause to work this matter up in their churches as it should be done, we urge the delegates to do all they possibly can to educate their respective churches in the cause of missions, and collect what they can.

As we have supported this work, the cause of Christ and the truth has prospered in our State. On its successful prosecution in the future depends, in a large measure, the work of Home Missions, Foreign Missions, the Orphanage and all other Conventional objects.

We have this year employed in our State Mission work 98 missionaries. Forty of these are working in the Western part of our Convention, 24 in the Middle section, and 34 in the Eastern part of the State. These missionaries are preaching to 450 different congregations. God has wonderfully blessed their efforts. God's blessings upon any of our undertakings always mean something. We believe that the Lord is pointing to a larger effort on our part to save North Carolina for Christ.

During the session of the Convention we are to report that every one has realized this and have promised to do more for this great work next year. At present we are in need of immediate help. Only \$5,000 have been received. During the next four or five weeks we have to raise \$10,000.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

We see Wake Forest full of Baptist boys who fill the city pulpits North and South, East and West, so well as to command respect and obtain a place along by the side of other denominations as religious orators or preachers of the Gospel. We believe we ought to help in the higher education of our boys and girls; yet, at the same time we ought to look after our own preparatory schools and thereby cultivate the latent talent which has lain hidden till death has swept it away. However, if we would take more interest in our preparatory schools, we would thereby furnish more fitly prepared boys for Wake Forest and other higher institutions of learning, also girls for Oxford.

We recommend that this body require a report from every Baptist preacher who has charge of a church of this Association, stating

the number of Baptist Schools in his charge and the condition of the several schools, and especially to report how many boys and girls they shall have sent to the Bostic High School under the efficient management of Prof. B H Bridges.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We greatly rejoice in the progress that has been made in the past. The work that has been done is something for which to praise God. Within the recollection of man yet living, the door of many nations was closed against the Gospel, now it is wide open to the best effort of consecrated christian zeal. Then the ignorance of language stood across the path of progress, now the Bible is read in almost, if not every language that is spoken on earth. Then superstition stood like a giant with drawn sword to hold in check every effort put forth for the enlightenment of the world; old religions now going into decay were strongly entrenched in minds as ignorant as superstitious. Race and national pride and prejudice stood as a bulwark against the onward march of the Gospel of God. In the home land we knew but little and cared less as to the condition of the heathen, and large numbers were actually opposed to offering them any help. Now sermons are preached, papers are published, and societies and committees without number. Then no one, rich or poor, thought of giving at all, except in small amounts and only a few givers could be found. Now efforts are being made with some success to get all of the membership to do something, and rich men are making large gifts, millions are praying, Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Broad and deep are the foundations already laid, and the superstructure will surely be for the glory of God.

But we are sure of several things :

First, we are ashamed that it has taken us a hundred years to lay foundations, and that to-day we are only playing with the Lord's work. Second, that we need more zeal among pastors and people, as well as more effective methods for collecting money for, and disseminating knowledge of missions. Third, that we ought to give greater encouragement to the woman's mission societies, and to the training of our young people in missionary work. Fourth, that all of us need to study the lesson of stewardship taught in the word of God. Fifth, that far too small a number of our people feel an interest in the work assigned us to subscribe and pay for and read the Foreign Mission Journal. And we are equally as sure, thank God, that thy kingdom will come, that Christ shall reign, and that the

hosts of darkness must and will be overcome by the marching millions who are armed with the Spirit and are filled with the love of God.

HOME MISSIONS.

If there is any word that we love, it is home, and so Home Missions should lie near our hearts. The Savior said, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth. Let us commence at home in preaching the Gospel. We have done something to send it abroad, but our people give less for Home Missions than any Mission. Last year our Association gave only \$89 00 for this object. We have nearly 4,000 members in this Association. If each member should give the small sum of five cents, it would amount to two hundred dollars—more than twice the amount we are now giving. This is no unreasonable requirement. Let us suggest that our preachers, who have no charges, go into some destitute section and hold meetings during the next year. If they are not paid in dollars and cents, they will be rewarded in some other way. We recommend that each church appoint one of its members to look after Home Missions during the next year. If some one was appointed to look after the different objects of this Association, we will do more for the cause than heretofore.

Sketch of the Life and Labors of Rev. J. H. Yarboro.

Rev. J. H. Yarboro was born on Beaver Dam creek, in Cleveland county, October 23rd, 1831.

He made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, in Polk county, in the year 1856. He joined the church at Rock Spring, Polk county, and was baptized by Elder B. E. Rollins in the same year. He was licensed to preach by this church in October, 1857, and in January, 1863, was ordained to the full work by Elders Baily Brace, Thomas Stradley, Lewis McCurry, and B. E. Rollins. While he had obtained a tolerably good English education in the country schools, he was determined to educate if possible. I have often heard him speak of his struggles for an education. When he started to the Taylorsville High School, in Alexander county, he had only one dollar in his pocket. He could not see his way, but adopted the maxim, "Where there is a will there is a way." He was in school at this place about two years. He afterwards entered Wake Forest College, but by reason of the war, he lacked a few months of finishing his collegiate course. After leaving college he preached in Wilmington for about two years. He then returned to his native county, and on the 19th day of February, 1865, he married Miss Lenora Stroud, who proved an affectionate help meet during all his busy and toilsome scenes of life. Since that time he has preached and taught in Cleveland, Rutherford, Polk, Wilkes, Yadkin, Madison, Watauga and Buncomb counties, and also a missionary and teacher in the bounds of the Broad River Association.

While a member of the King's Mountain Association, he was prominent as a preacher, and was often appointed to preach the Annual Sermons, and to write Circular Letters to the churches. His Circular Letters on Mission in 1868 was considered a masterly production. He was Moderator the same year. So as preacher or teacher he has been an active worker in the cause of his Master.

His whole life was a shining example of true Christianity. As a preacher his sermons were more remarkable for their practical and logical bearings than for their rhetorical brilliancy. He would hold an audience for an hour with his illatives, reaching his logical conclusions. He always evinced a thorough knowledge of his subjects, and spared no pains in trying to lodge their full meaning into the minds of his hearers.

Mr. Yarboro was very unassuming and never sought the approbation of his fellow-men, but seemed anxious only for that honor which comes from above. His love never vaunted itself, was never puffed up.

After having made one of his best efforts, when he was done his lips were forever sealed as to his own message. He therefore courted the confidence of no one. He had rather walk in the dark with God than in the light with the world. When he began to reach the Jordan of life he became stronger in the Baptist faith and practices. His faith and convictions were such that he said the deeper he waded the firmer the bottom. In his last sermon he plead for the faith once delivered unto the saints.

Mr. Yarboro was sometimes despondent, at others he seemed to rise to the height of full assurance. His last sermon was preached at Floyd's Creek church, where it is said that he soared throughout his

sermon to the height of that full assurance. He come down from the pulpit and bade his friends good-byē, walked to his buggy and, while harnessing his horse, he fell to rise no more. His soul winged its way to the mansions of glory, leaving a loving companion, daughter and son to mourn their loss. Well can they say that he was an affectionate husband and father.

We recommend to your consideration also The North Carolina Baptist, Charity and Children, the Foreign Mission Journal and The Home Field.

Brethren, let us bestir ourselves. We will never be an active people unless we read. The great principles that we believe to be taught in the Word of God must lag in our churches unless we read and support the literature of our denomination.

EVENING SESSION.

At the hour appointed the Moderator called the Association to order. Prayer by Rev. J. B. Green.

The motion on Time of Association was taken up and tabled.

Report of Education was presented by B. H. Bridges as follows.

EDUCATION.

This is a subject, to the minds of your committee, that has as strong claims upon this Association as any other subject; and the time has come when parents and guardians can offer no excuse for their children living and dying in ignorance. If we will only encourage the means within our reach and do our duty towards God and our children, the time is not far distant when the bright-eyed boys and girls in our midst will be able to get thought from the printed page and put thought on the page.

Early life is the season to secure an education. It is in youth that the mind more readily receives impressions and more permanently retains them. It is in youth that the elements are acquired that make the subsequent character and decide the future life of the individual. In youth one has time to study and can enjoy study, which cannot be enjoyed by one in the cares and business of life.

Then, if our children are to have the above advantages, we must furnish these advantages. Upon us devolves the responsibility of

deciding the character and culture of our own children who are to take the places of us in this body and every other important position in the next generation. If we fail to give our children the best possible advantages within our reach, we are unfaithful to our trust. Our children have been given to us in trust; and upon us—the Baptists of this Association, the Baptists of North Carolina—are the most fearful and solemn obligations and responsibilities: to see to it that these advantages are secured for our children.

Brethren, let us impress the thought that Baptists not only OUGHT to educate their children, but MUST educate them, and in schools under the supervision of Baptists.

We have schools within the bounds of this Association which are worthy of our patronage and encouragement. Let us look around us, brethren, put our children in schools, and see that they are well equipped for the battle of life.

It is with much pride that we call the attention of our young men to our beloved Wake Forest College. She is second to none in the South. We would therefore admonish you to prepare yourselves for college. We have secondary schools in our midst ready to prepare young men for college. We would urge the young brethren in the ministry to use every means possible to go to Wake Forest that you may be able to present God's truths intelligently to the people you must meet at the bar of God. It is with no less pride that we invite the attention of the young ladies to the Baptist Female University which will furnish opportunities for the highest intellectual culture under the supervision of Baptists. We commend to the brethren their liberality and support of this Institution—

ORPHANAGE.

The Baptist Orphanage has just closed a year of great prosperity. A gracious Providence has cared for the health of the officers and children. Though a severe epidemic of measles has prevailed, only one child died from the disease. One has died from heart disease and one from dropsy.

Since the last session of this body many valuable improvements have been made. The Central or School Building has been completed, at a cost of more than \$5,000. During the past year this has been occupied and found admirably suited to the purpose for

which it was erected. By means of this building the Superintendent has been enabled to grade the school properly, and thus to have the children more thoroughly taught. And, too, the congregating of the children into this building for instruction has opened for sleeping rooms the room heretofore used for school rooms. The Trustees have thus found themselves in a position to admit a larger number of orphans than the original plan of buildings permitted.

A home for the general manager—certainly an urgent need—is in process of erection. He and his wife have heretofore been housed in the infirmary, an inconvenient arrangement, especially in case of epidemic disease raging. The treasurer's report shows that the sum of \$586.42 has been contributed for this building, though twelve hundred dollars were subscribed at the last session of the Baptist State Convention.

A new printing press and general outfit for "Charity and Children" have been secured at a cost of several hundred dollars. A marked improvement in the general make-up—the mechanical part—of the paper has been observed by all. It is carefully and ably edited, and is in all respects admirably filling its sphere. The treasurer's report shows that the receipts from subscriptions and advertising have exceeded the expenses by \$450.58.

The Orphanage owns a farm of over three hundred acres of fairly valuable land. The products of this farm for the last year are estimated to be worth \$1,282.00. The total expenses of making this crop were \$649.45, leaving a net profit of \$632.55.

The total receipts in money and in kind for the last year reached the magnificent sum of \$13,871.05—the largest for any year in the history of the Orphanage. A part of this was used to pay off the debt on the Central building—a part, \$1,000, was legacy from Dr. R. D. Fleming's estate—and \$9,016.00 were used to clothe, feed and teach one hundred and sixty children—making the average cost per head \$56.00. And your Committee begs to assure this body that this sum, wisely used, has been found sufficient to maintain in a very comfortable style the orphan children under the care of this institution.

It is painful to close this report by recording the death of two of the trustees during the past year—Bro. John Marcom, of Durham, N. C., and Dr. R. D. Fleming, of Warrenton, N. C.,—both devoted friends of the institution, giving their time and means freely for its advancement. Dr. Fleming was one of the largest contributors in the State.

The location of the Orphanage is ideal. Just a mile from the village of Thomasville, on the Southern Railway in a beautiful grove of native oak and hickory will be found the home for the orphan children of our brothers and sisters who have been called away from earth. The buildings, all well arranged, consist of five dormitories, a printing house and laundry, a Central School Building, an In-

firmly, and a home for General Manager now in process of erection, are estimated to be worth \$25,000.00.

Report on Ministerial Support, by J. C. Gillespie, as follows :

MINISTERIAL SUPPORT.

We are encouraged to believe from the reports sent up from the different churches that our people are realizing more and more their duty to heartily support the ministry, but still we are made to feel that we fall far short in many instances. The Word tells us that the gospel is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth (Rom. 1:16) and that it pleases God through the foolishness of preaching to save those that believe (1 Cor. 1:21.) We are taught also that it was ordained of God that men should preach this gospel, and so men called of God have been set apart to this work ever since the time of our Savior.

Brethren, these men of God should have our hearty support, for in this lies much of their efficiency for this work. If they are forced to spend their time in doing something else to make a living, then they are robbed of the time they need to prepare themselves for their ministerial duties. And even when they do find a little time which they can spend in this work, their minds and hearts are poorly prepared on account of having become dulled by these other engagements.

Your committee heartily recommends that the minister be well supported, and that the churches make an effort to do it on the instalment plan, consisting of monthly or quarterly payments. This will aid much in getting up the salary. Much more can be raised with far less trouble on this plan than what has usually been raised under the old plan of paying all at one time in the year. Breth-

ren, try it.

This, too, will greatly help the preacher to meet his obligations through the year, and help him to keep out of many disagreeable and harmful embarrassments.

BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNION.

Your committee on the B. Y. P. U. make the following report: This organization was born of necessity. Our young people were drifting away from church and Sunday school. We could not hold them with the methods then in hand.

Its purpose is to teach and train for christian service, its motto being "We study that we may serve." The Bible is a text book and its doctrines, as held by Baptists, are insisted upon. Baptist history is a specialty and missions occupy a large place. To accomplish this there are three courses arranged, known as the Christian Culture Course; the Bible Reader's Course, completing the Bible in four years of daily reading, systematically arranged; the Conquest Missionary Course, in which we read of the spread and progress of the Kingdom of God; the Sacred Literature course, in which Baptist doctrines are taught.

The literature for all this is furnished by The Baptist Union, a paper only a few years old. yet it has a larger circulation than any other Baptist paper in the world.

Those taking the paper are furnished with examination blanks in each one of the courses and a diploma is furnished those who graduate in any of these courses. Each local union is under the control of the church to which it belongs, and the constitution requires loyalty to church.

The report on State Missions was submitted by H. D. Harrill as follows :

STATE MISSIONS.

The history of State Missions is virtually the history of the rise and progress of North Carolina Baptists reaching from the year 1720 to the present time.

It is a work so clearly in accordance with Divine commandment, with the spirit of Jesus and with the nobler impulses of the Christian heart and life that it needs no argument to commend it to the sympathies of the Association.

Since the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools was organized our State Missionaries have preached the Gospel on over 4,000 destitute fields, and have organized at mission points more than one-

third of the whole number of Baptist churches we now have in North Carolina. And along with this God-blessed work of construction and evangelization, every department of our denominational life has been stimulated—Education, the Orphanage, Home Missions and Foreign Missions—have felt and continue to feel the effect of State Missions on them in Endowments, patronage, support and sympathy and an enlarged beneficence at the hands of our people.

Your committee is glad to report that the Baptists of North Carolina have a larger force of missionaries in the field this year than ever before in our history. One hundred and three regular missionaries are at work preaching the Gospel to three hundred and fifty-eight destitute points. The cause is being pressed by these faithful workers in fifty-six counties in North Carolina.

The reports from their fields as they have come in indicate encouragement and even enthusiasm. God is blessing the Word in their hands. We may depend upon it, His grace will be poured out upon their labors. Ours is the duty of prayer and sympathy. It is the battle of our Christ which they are waging, the battle our cause and our priceless principles. We should feel honored of God that we are co-laborers with Him in the great work of bringing North Carolina to own and honor our Master. The burden, if it is reckoned a burden, the responsibility, is on us to support this work and these workers.

We have planned and arranged the work this year on a \$15,000 basis. All the year the missionaries have been at work, hopefully relying upon our faithfulness in paying the small amounts promised.

As yet only a small proportion of the amount needed has been raised—the day is now on us when each must do something. We recommend to every pastor that he urge his churches to make an offering for State Mission by December 1st.

FRIDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Association reassembled at 9.30 a. m.

Devotional exercises were conducted by the Moderator.

The roll of delegates was called and absentees erased. Minutes of yesterday read, corrected and approved.

Moved by C. P. Hill, that a Committee on Queries be appointed by the Moderator. Motion prevailed.

On motion of G. B. Pruett, Home Missions was made a special hour at 11 o'clock a. m.

A. C. Irvin presented the following report on temperance:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Temperance is so closely connected with the vitals of religion, that one can hardly be on the side of intemperance and be on God's side. We are taught that God so loved the world that He gave His son that men should not *perish*, but have life (Jno.iii. 16). Intemperance is to blight, curse and kill, hence its promoters are among the enemies of God. Temperance is a moderation of appetites and passions. We might speak of eating, of the various uses of tobacco and other things, but our design is to speak especially of the drink habit. The cost of intoxicating liquor consumed yearly by Amer-

icans is estimated at about \$1,176,872,422, or \$17 per head, including infants and abstainers. It is estimated also that the intoxicant cost in "the destruction of food at brewing and distilling, the cost of pauperism, crime, lunacy, etc., arising from intemperance, represent a loss to the community equal to the annual drink bill."

So adding these costs we have an annual expense of about \$2,393,744,844, or more than twice as much as our wheat, corn and pork costs us. The effects on the system is alarming." There is no agreement between the wants of the human system and alcohol. Alcohol impairs our usefulness in life. A large per cent of idiots (scarcely any report put it below 70 per cent), perhaps a still larger per cent of paupers and criminals, are made by this habit of drink. Last, but not least, it sends yearly about 100,000 victims to the drunkard's grave. Now, brethren, our own beloved North Carolina, and even the boundary represented by the Sandy Run Association, encourages this evil to an alarming extent. We hope some progress has been made in the cause of temperance. Oh, brethren, what shall we do? All Christian denominations in America give only about \$5,500,000 annually for Foreign Missions. Yet we are giving more than \$2,000,000,000 indirectly to make heathen at home. Shall we continue this course? Let us arise, unite our strength, and put down this awful demon, that is robbing our country of its billions, wrecking so many lives, and sending thousands of souls to eternal destruction.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

We, your committee, would submit the following report on Home Missions:

- THE BOARD

is located in Atlanta, Ga., with Dr. F. H. Kerfoot as Corresponding Secretary.

ITS MISSION

is to the destitution in the large centers of population, the frontier and Indian in the West, the mountain country, and the negroes of the South, the foreign population from *everywhere*, and all Western Cuba.

During the last conventional year the Board employed for a part or the whole of their time 653 missionaries, who performed 17,424 weeks of labor, delivered 64,718 sermons and addresses, baptized 6,552 persons, received 6,431 by letter, constituted 194 churches, built 92 houses of worship at a cost of \$50,050.33. In addition to this amount, the churches in the States raised \$65,818.81, and the Womans Missionary Union contributed in cash \$14,192 and boxes to the value of \$22,567, making a grand total of \$138,436.14 raised and expended on the field.

In the prosecution of this great work the Board is supported by the denominational papers of all the Southern States, the Mission rooms in Baltimore, its own paper —*The Home Field*—and about 2,000,000 pages of missionary leaflets which it has sent out to carry their message of love to the millions of readers who love the work.

THE NEEDS

of the Board are, first, more money, men and women; second, a deeper sympathy on the part of God's hosts, and their prayers.

We, therefore, recommend that all the churches do their utmost to inform their members on the subject, and induce them each one to make a contribution to this cause.

We further recommend, that an increase of at least twenty per cent be made in the contribution of all the churches.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your committee on State Missions beg leave to make the following report:

State Missions is the foundation upon which all other missions are standing, and are to some degree dependent for their success.

So we can see at once the importance of State Missions, that is, missions in North Carolina. There are one hundred men engaged who are preaching the gospel to 368 destitute places in 56 counties in our own State.

God is blessing their work and the special meetings on our mission fields are having an abundant ingathering this year.

Let us consider our obligations to State Missions. There are in North Carolina 1,000,000 people without Christ, and the majority of these do not even attend church. Many of these have no church to attend and no preacher to hear. Brethren, these are our own people, and as sure as you are saved by Christ they are lost without Him. The responsibility is upon us—what shall we do? We have worked this year on a \$20,000-dollar basis. All the year the missionaries have been working relying upon our faithfulness. The amount promised them up to this time has not been paid. Your committee would suggest that the churches make an effort to increase their contributions to State Missions as early as possible.

The following report on Foreign Missions was submitted by B. H. Bridges:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your committee on Foreign Missions are sorry that we have not space to report the exact number of foreign missionaries, their post-offices and fields of labor. We think that our people ought to be familiar with the names of our missionaries and their stations of labor. We think that we would have more sympathy for them and their work. We see from the report of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, that many new missionaries were appointed during last year. We will give their names and fields of labor: T. C. Joyce and wife, C. D. McArthur and wife, Miss Mary B. Wilcox, J. L. Downing and wife, and W. W. Lee, in Brazil; R. P. Mahon and wife, and J. S. Cheavans and wife, in Mexico; Miss Anna M. Green, J. W. Lowe and wife, in China; W. W. Clark, Japan; Mrs. W. T. Lumbley and A. C. Dawes, a colored brother, in Africa.

The above does not mean that our missionary laborers have been increased to this extent. Some are to take the places of those who for various reasons have laid down the work. Yet there is an increase of workers, and it calls for an increased effort on our part.

In Italy we have about fifteen stations with as many laborers; in Brazil, 9 with 23; in Mexico, 16 with 27; in Africa, 4 with 7 and some native assistants; in South China, 3 fields with 18 missionaries, and native helpers consisting of 8 ordained preachers, 10 unordained preachers, 7 Bible women; in Central China, 4 fields with 13 missionaries, and in Japan, 3 with 7 missionaries. The Lord is

blessing the labors of our brethren in all these fields. During last year there were 427 baptisms in China, 37 in Africa, 38 in Italy, 45 in Mexico, 285 in Brazil, and in Japan 13—making a total of 845. Brethren, should we not feel proud of this great work? For the year '97-'98 the State contributed for Foreign Missions \$7,555.08. For the year '98-99 she gave \$8,092.91, an increase of \$547.93. To how much of this increase can we lay claim? We may refuse to increase our pledges, but this work must and will go on. We may fail, but there are others who will not fail. Since the great battle for Christian liberty was begun by our Lord Jesus more than 1850 years ago, we have taken over half of the earth's area under Christian government, and nearly half of the population.

Hence we see that victory is coming, if we do nothing. Can we regret the small amounts that we have been giving? While living in this wonderful age of religious progress, how can we refuse to keep pace with the work and results by increasing our pledges? We can not console ourselves with the thought that if victory is coming, we are released from greater efforts. Every advance calls louder for greater efforts, and brings us under greater obligations to do more than we have ever done.

The divine command by the divine authority of Jesus Christ is, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Brethren, let us try to feel the constraining force and importance of this command. Is what we are doing the exponent of our convictions of this command? Let us to-day bring ourselves under greater obligations to do our whole duty, by increasing our pledges to the cause of Foreign, State, and Home Missions.

We have fine schools in different parts of the State, for which, any people should be proud, and, more especially, Wake Forest, where so many of our young men have graduated, and many prepared themselves to preach the everlasting gospel to the heathen in foreign lands as well as to the people here in our own native country. We are glad to state that we now have a Baptist Female University located at Raleigh for young ladies, we hope it may prove a blessing to many. We believe there should be a Baptist High School established in every Association in the State. The Sabbath School is a

great institution, here we have so many Christians training and teaching the children the Bible. We all need to be better educated in the Bible. In this book, we are taught to bring up the children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. God says, My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge. We would say to the brethren try to have good singing in your churches. In order to do this it is necessary that we employ persons who understand music to teach us how to sing. Brethren, education is a subject that should interest us all. We are glad to say, that we, as Baptists of North Carolina, stand higher in the scale of intellectual science than we have at any period in the past. We have men in our ranks who are able to defend the Baptist cause and principles, and stand shoulder to shoulder with any other denomination or people in education in the State.

CONSTITUTION.

We, the united Baptist Churches of Jesus Christ, located in Cleveland and Rutherford counties, in the State of North Carolina, having all been immersed upon a profession of our faith in Christ, and having obtained letters of dismissal from the Kings Mountain and Green River Associations, propose to maintain the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan:

ARTICLE 1st. This Association shall be known by the name of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

2nd. This Association shall be composed of such members as shall be chosen and recommended by the churches in union.

3rd. Other churches may become members of this Association by their delegates presenting certificates of their appointment, provided on examination they may be found orthodox.

4th. The Association shall organize by electing, by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall hold their appointments one associational year, and until their successors are elected, unless displaced by the Body.

5th. This Association, as an act of Christian courtesy, may invite ministers of our denomination to seats with us in council.

6th. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum which the Body is authorized to form for itself.

7th. This Association hath an inalienable right to judge what churches shall be admitted into its confederacy.

8th. The Association thus formed, shall be regarded by us, only in the light of an advisory council, with no coercive power to "Lord it over God's heritage."

9th. This Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in its connection that shall hold corrupt doctrines or indulge in sinful or vicious practices.

10th. Every church in union, having a membership not exceeding fifty in number, shall be entitled to a representation of two delegates, and one additional delegate for every increase of fifty over that number. All ordained ministers of this Association are delegates ex-officio.

11th. The primary object of this Association shall be to strive for the unity of the spirit in the bonds of peace among the churches, the employment of missionaries, and to keep up the statistical accounts of the churches in its connection, and, finally, to concentrate our efforts for the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth, and for the deposition of the works of darkness.

12th. None but the members of this body shall be allowed to vote in its councils, and a majority shall decide in disposing of and settling all business that may constitutionally come before them.

13th. This Association in all cases disclaims the right, in its associate capacity, to settle church difficulties, but when a division occurs and two parties equally claim to be the church and represent themselves by letter and delegate, this Association shall have the right to decide, at the first or some future meeting of its body thereafter, which party, if either, shall be recognized as the constitutional church and entitled to a seat in council.

14th. The minutes of the Association shall be read each day and corrected, if need be, by the Body, and when the business shall have been completed, assigned by the Moderator, and Clerk before the Association rises.

15th. Any Article of this Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, by a majority of two-thirds of the delegates present voting for the same.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. Introductory sermon.
2. Call to order by the Moderator, if present; if he is not present, by the Clerk.
3. Reading letters of churches and enrolling names of delegates.
4. Election of officers, to-wit: Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer.
5. Invite visiting brethren to seats.
6. Call for churches to become members of the Association.
7. Call for letters and messengers from other Associations.
8. Appointment of committee on Religious Exercises.
9. Appointment of committees as follows: Temperance, Religious Literature, Sunday Schools and Colportage, Education, State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Baptist Orphanage, Finance, Obituaries, Ministerial Support, Ministerial Relief Board.
10. Appoint messengers to corresponding Associations and delegates to the Baptist State Convention, and a delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention.
11. Call for reports from committees in the order in which they were appointed.
12. Appoint the time and place of next meeting, and preacher of the Introductory Sermon.
13. Treasurer's report.
14. Business matters or questions laid over from previous meeting; new business, motions, resolutions, etc.
15. Adjournment.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We are glad to hope that the cause of temperance is progressing according to the best information that we can gather. The churches have been troubled less with the evils of intemperance during the year than in any year of the past, especially with reference to the use of intoxicants to excess, which we regard as the most corrupting and debasing of intemperance, and one which has given the churches more trouble than almost any other vice. The churches seem to be growing more sensitive to the great evils of intoxication and consequently are unwilling to indulge their members in it.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Baptists should not define education in so broad a sense as to be the transformation of any human power into an actuality. This is to say that education may be toward either a higher or a lower life. We should not hold that those who seduce to evil are in any sense educators, nor that those who acquire such knowledge are in any sense educated. We all know that our real life is a mental life, a life of thoughts, feelings and volitions; and hence, we should always use the word in that restricted sense as referring to the improvement of this mental life only. Then we should define education as any development toward a higher life, intellectually, morally and spiritually; and not the training toward a lower life. So there can be only one comprehensive end of education, to prepare our children for the complete fulfillment

of the purposes for which they were created. These purposes were for their own highest well-beings and happiness. For our children to be happy they must know their obligations to their fellow-man, to society, to state and to their God; and they must be prepared to discharge these obligations. Before they can do this there are facts, principals and laws of this mental life that must be understood. Education only will develop these, and will give directions for applying them in our mental lives. Youth is the time to make these developments, and however pressing the necessity for labor in domestic and agricultural pursuits, time should be given for the culture of this mental life.

Brethren, our highest aim should be to accomplish such culture as will continue to widen the horizon of the minds of our children during their whole lives. The time has come when we must have sufficient enterprise and self-denial to prepare our children for this higher life.

Of course it is needless to say to you that we should always keep Wake Forest College in our minds as worthy of our earnest prayers and a liberal patronage. In addition we have preparatory schools that should receive your patronage.

Brethren we are glad to state in the report, that nearly all the churches have Sunday Schools, but are not as well attended by church members as should be. We have 3,836 members in the Sunday Schools, and only 468 are church members, about one-eighth.

Brethren, let us increase our number. Go forward in the great work and do more for Christ and his Kingdom. In training our children in the "nurture and admonition of the Lord."

We commend the State Sunday School Board in appointing our worthy brother G B Pruett as Sunday School missionary for the Association. He has visited about one-half the churches in the Association during the past year. His visits have been very helpful, and we hope therefore, that the Board will continue brother Pruett's services in the Association.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

It is a sad thought that the heathen world is perishing, that million upon millions are in spiritual darkness, and going down to everlasting death. How fortunate for us, that we live in the full blaze of gospel light, that we rejoice in the love of God and the liberty of the sons and daughters of our Heavenly Father. But this only increases our responsibility to send the Gospel to those who have it not. As long as we are taught to pray "Thy kingdom come;" "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature;" "As the Father hath sent Me even so send I you;" Our commission is plain enough. For every dollar we contribute to Foreign Missions, we keep forty-nine at home and give to the objects around us. Here we have one minister to every 750 of our people; there whole cities and territories, with hundreds of thousands of perishing souls have no preacher to plead, no voice to warn, no one to invite them to the Cross of Christ where they may find light and salvation. In our Southland we have 12,228 preachers, 6,600 pastors, and on Foreign field only 41 preachers we have sent out. Yes, we have 300 here to one there. Can we not raise our contribution to this object at least thirty per cent. the coming year. While the prospect in China may look dark to the unthinking mind, the situation is quite hopeful to the thoughtful individual. Our missionaries are much encouraged. The Consuls have agreed to protect foreign life and property. The Empress Dowager is preparing for the worst and is suing for peace. The dethroned Emperor will probably be put back by the powers upon the throne, and the mission work which has come to an apparent stand still is in a hopeful attitude. The anti-christian, anti-foreign movement will certainly be put down and the party coming into power will owe their power to foreigners and will be favorable to them. Doors for the entrance of the gospel will be thrown open and we must be ready to enter with the open Bible to give to those deluded people. The time for action has come. God is leading the way. We need to follow the fiery pillars and victory will follow our efforts to do the Master's will. While it is right to pray for the heathen, let us pray that the churches may have a spirit of enlarged liberality, and that every member of this Association may do more for this object than he has ever done.

This Board has for the past fifty years been a factor in doing State Mission work in North Carolina. Twenty of the strongest churches in our State were aided in their earliest efforts by the Home Mission Board. This year our State will receive from this Board for Mission work, for co-operation and education the sum of five thousand dollars. The future of the Board was never so bright and so hopeful. We commend it to the liberal support of our gospel. In every church let us have some one who will see that every member has an opportunity to contribute to this glorious work;

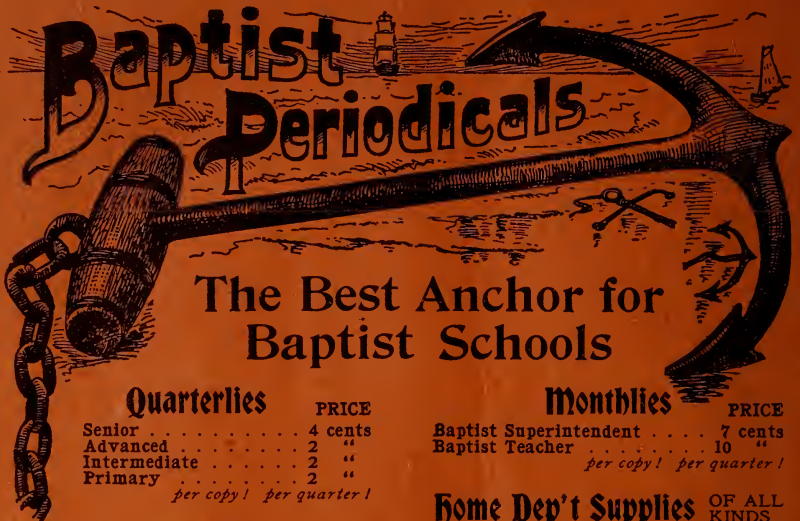

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The care that we should have for the orphan is in the nature of the religion of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this: To visit the fatherless and widow in their affliction and to keep himself unspotted from the world. Two things to do, 1st to keep the orphan and widow, 2nd to refrain from doing evil. The first we are endeavoring to carry out in part. The Thomasville Baptist Orphanage which is estimated to be worth \$40000. Within the past six years \$25,000 have been added to the value of the plant. The Mills building has been completed within a year at a cost of \$5000. The Biggs building has been greatly enlarged and improved, the cost of which was \$2770. 245 children have been handled during the year at the close of the year 210 children were in the care of the institution. The health record of the year has been remarkable. The bill for medicine and medical attention falling under \$100. The Orphanage has been so well managed as to make the average cost of maintaining a child \$4.33 per month. The outlook before the orphanage was never brighter. The educational advantages are good. This great work is done through the charity of the Baptist of North Carolina having a good work in progress let us continue with our best efforts. The Orphanage paper Charity & Children should find a place in our homes.

REPORT ON EDUCATION

We notice in the census report of 1900 that it gives 753,826 children of school age in the state, of this number 490,728 are white, out of that number only 263,217 attend school, that leaves 227,565 to be accounted for. We also notice there are 100000 white men and women in the State that can not read or write. These statements ought to stir every person, old or young, in North Carolina upon the subject of education. If something is not done many young men will be deprived of certain privileges as citizens in a few years. We are glad the Baptist are waking up to a sense of duty on the subject of education. We were once called an ignorant people, but now we have as good high schools and colleges as any other denomination in the State. We are glad to see the Baptist in Western North Carolina making such rapid improvements. There are now four times as many boys and girls who attend Baptist schools as were a few years ago. Let us in the Sandy Run Association try to have a Baptist school in our bounds for our children. Other denominations have their own schools let us not be in the rear in this noble work. We are proud of Wake Forest and the good we believe it has done for us as a denomination. We are taught by the inspiration of God to teach his word to our children when we lie down and when we rise up and when we walk by the way.

Brethern, we are taught by the Holy Spirit how we should live if we only give heed to it. We are taught by the apostle Paul in the Romans 8-14, as many as are led by the Spirit of God they are the sons of God. Let us all try and improve ourselves intellectually

morally and Spiritually while we live in this world so when we are called to leave this teniment of clay we can enter that rest prepared for the people of God. We are in sympathy with the century movement to raise one hundred thousand dollars for centenal purposes in our denomination in N. C and we will try to raise our part of same.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

State Missions is at the root of all other missions. Just as a denomination looks after missions in its own State, will it look after missions at home and abroad. This is undoubtedly true and can not be successfully contradicted. We have an illustration of this in North Carolina. Seventy four years ago the Baptists of North Carolina divided on Missions, Sunday Schools and revival meetings. The Baptists who hold our present views which are the Old Bible or New Testament views, then numbered 15000 in 1830, the year the North Carolina Convention of Baptists organized in Greenville. They believed in spreading the Gospel, and hence a college to educate teachers and those called of God to preach the glad tidings of salvation. They believed in building up the waste places at home and in making the wilderness of intellectual and spiritual ignorance to rejoice and blossom like a rose. Hence they organized a board of missions, and it went to work. Wake Forest became the school of prophets for our boys. Murfresboro, Oxford and other schools became the meca of learning for our girls. While high schools of various grades dotted the State here and there in which the intellectual axes of our leading men and most useful women were sharpened. As mission work increased in its efficiency, our people began to find that the country's people made the towns, and thus the towns that had hitherto been neglected began to be occupied. Thence the work grew and our members increased until our people saw the need of the Orphanage which has grown out of the State mission work. Last of all the University at Raleigh for the higher education of our girls had its origin in the State Mission idea. There is more destitution in the Tar River Association than in any other Association of the State and yet the Tar River Association has done more than any other Association for State Missions. At one period in its history it dedicated a

new church building at each session of its union. It is the largest contributor to the Orphanage. It furnished the President for the Baptist Female University, and all of this is State Mission work. We honor the men who live. Humphrey Posey rode his pony five times from New York to Ashville to preach the gospel to the people beyond the Blue Ridge. Of Shubael Stearnes and others who brought it to the eastern and central part of the State and planted the same firmly in the Chowan and Sandy Creek sections. The 100 missionaries of our State Board who are standing in the destitute sections holding forth the word of life. But these men must have the amounts due them if they hold the work together. Our churches are pledged to their support. Unforeseen indebtedness has forced a trial of our liberality. Let us not waver in this time of great need. Let the Sandy Run do her duty and all will be well.

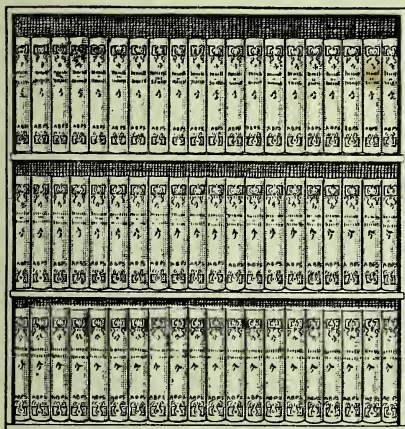



REPORT ON EDUCATION.

In the report of the Committee on Education, at Big Springs, a school in the interest of our Association was recommended. The report was adopted, but the school is yet to be formed.

That report also said: "We are in sympathy with the Century movement, and we will try to raise our part of the same." The Association also instructed the Moderator to apportion the amount asked of us (\$800.00), among the churches. At Winston-Salem, owing to the indebtedness of the Baptist Female University, being covered by a mortgage on the property, Wake Forest College and other Baptist Colleges very kindly and considerately withdrew any claim for help coming from the Century fund, until the Baptist Female University should be out of debt. So that the Century fund was reduced from \$100,000 to \$50,000, and this was covered by pledges running up to nearly that amount. The delegates from the Sandy Run Association pledged it for \$200 to be paid by the Convention in December, 1902. It is only too true that while one-fourth of the \$800 has been asked, that only a very little of the amount has been paid. We respectfully ask that the brethren raise the deficit by the required time, and that special efforts be made by all the pastors between this and the convention to bring this matter before their churches, and raise their proportionate part by the 15th of November. Your committee finds that according to the Minutes, that not a cent was reported for education last year. And not a

pledge was made except the Century apportionment as before stated. Your committee further suggests that a cash collection be taken for Ministerial Education at this Association, and that the roll of churches be called and pledges be taken for education as for the other objects of the Baptist State Convention. Bro, W. R. Cullom, who can not be with us desires this. He is chairman of the Board of Education, and writes that they have 44 young men who are needing help, and the Board is in great straits. We know of one or two young men from this Association who are preparing themselves for future usefulness, and we feel it our duty to encourage them as far as we are able. We advise all who can to patronize our Baptist Institutions. The boys can not go to a better place than Wake Forest College. The girls who can should attend the Baptist Female University, Oxford Seminary or the Chowan Baptist Female Institute.

Let us then, in the Sandy Run Association, try to do more than we ever have done for Home Missions. God's command is "go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature," and let us obey the command.

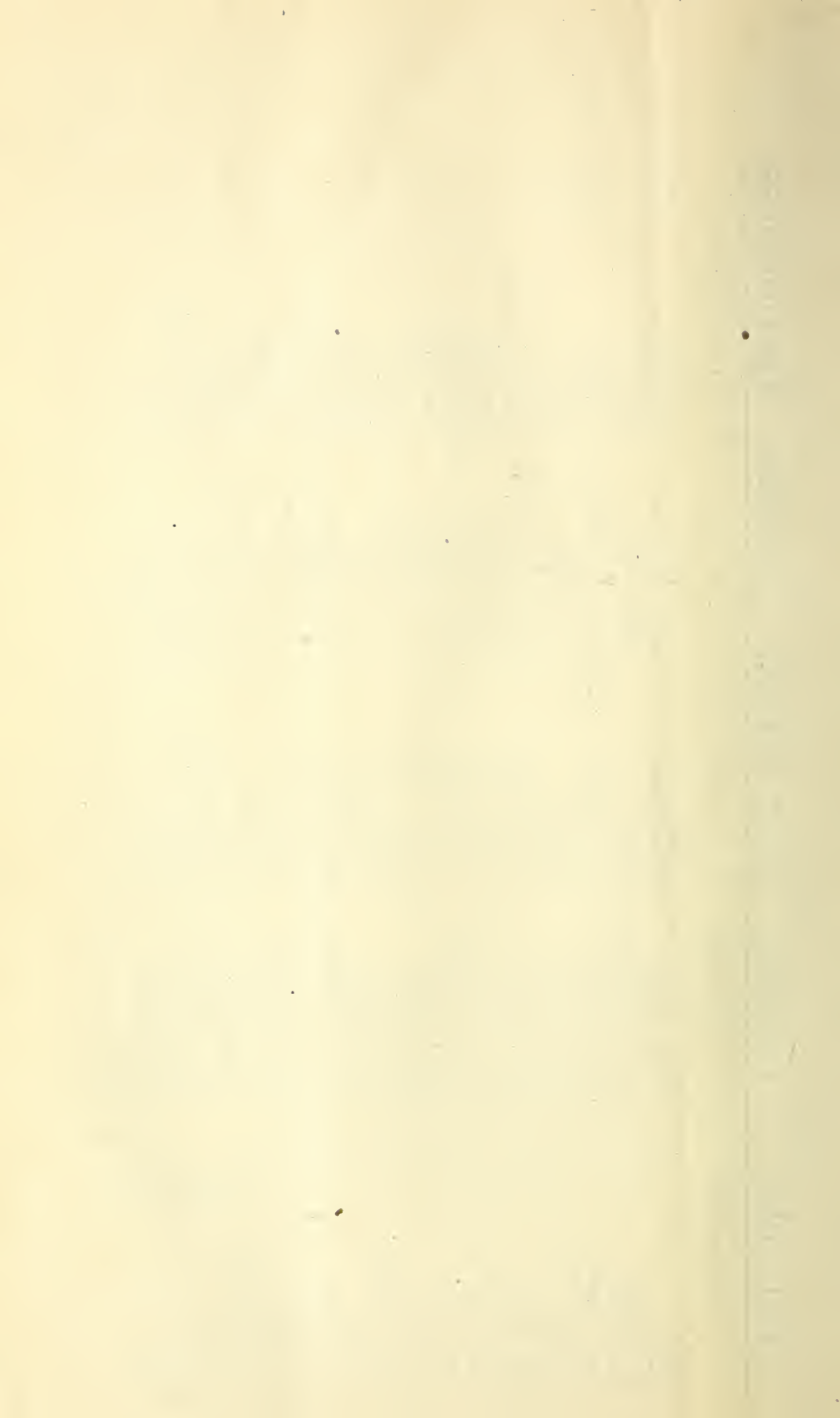

The subject of education should interest every individual who possesses any self-esteem or aspires to any position of credit or honor. We are glad to note the increased interest manifested in this subject among our people. For the better education of our boys and girls a first-class high school some where in the reach of all people is necessary. We are pained to know of large numbers of children who are growing up in our country without the advantage of a good school. While we think we are doing what we can in the way of building and maintaining schools we are only making a beginning in this direction. In evidence of this fact we will direct attention to the Pedo Baptist institutions which are being built and supported in our midst. We should not fail to avail ourselves of the benefits offered by the preparatory school within our reach. We hope that the movement started at our last session looking to the founding of a Denominational school may not prove an entire failure. In the event that the Sandy Run Association should find itself unequal to the task of building such a school as is needed alone, we would recommend that the trustees appointed by this Association consider the propriety of combining with one or more sister Associations in this work.

Brethren, we are of the opinion that the Baptist cause in some localities is suffering more from illiteracy of the pulpit than from any other source. We would respectfully urge upon our younger ministers especially to seek the best possible preparation for their life work, and recommend that our churches give more cordial and hearty support to

the cause of Ministerial Education by making liberal contributions to this object.

We commend Wake Forest College as the best institution for young men seeking a thorough classical education and our Female University at Raleigh as the best place for our girls.

The constructive and vitalizing energy of Christianity is strongly marked in the establishment of institutions for the unfortunate and helpless. Its provision for these is its standing recommendation, distinguishing it from all other religions and showing the superiority of Christ's religion over all others. Houses of refuge for the fallen, hospitals for the sick, asylums for the blind, deaf and dumb and demented, and homes for helpless poor, and orphans are the striking manifestations of a faith which claims power to redeem the race. If Christianity is asked to prove its worth by its works, we answer, "Think on these things."

"The Son of man came not to be ministered to but to minister, and to give His life a ransom for many." Orphanages and like institutions reveal the unselfish and practical nature of our religion. The great sin of paganism is that it sacrifices its poor and helpless. Christianity is a history of self-sacrifice in behalf of others. No feature of Christian ethics or of denominational effort appeals more strongly to our sympathy than the care of helpless, fatherless children.

Deprived of their natural protectors, their helplessness and innocence appeal to every noble instinct of our Christian manhood.

Their material comfort, their moral elevation and their spiritual regeneration are so many voices crying for our help.

How many orphans would fall into the hands of wicked, designing men, or drift with the tide of fallen humanity to moral degradation and spiritual ruin but for the shelter and protection these homes afford.

In these homes, their secular education, their industrial training, and, above all, their spiritual elevation is undertaken at an age when their minds are plastic, and when they are powerless to help themselves.

The Thomasville Orphanage not only feeds and clothes the body, but trains the mind to think, the hands to labor and the heart to embrace the great doctrines and duties of our religion.

We have an institution of which the denomination and the State may well be proud. Its spirit, management, and the results of its work are alike standing proofs of its power for good, and the strongest arguments in favor of its support and enlargement. They are an evidence that pure and undefiled religion are still among us.

Our Orphanage is caring for a large number of children. While there are individuals who contribute to the erection of buildings, the support of the children comes solely from the Churches. Let the pastors keep this fact constantly before their brethren in the churches.

Constitution of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

We, the united Baptist churches of Jesus Christ, located in Cleveland and Rutherford counties, in the State of North Carolina, having all been immersed upon a profession of our faith in Christ, and having obtained letters of dismissal from the King's Mountain and Green River Asso-

ciations, propose to maintain the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan:

ARTICLE 1st. This Association shall be known by the name of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

2nd. This Association shall be composed of such members as shall be chosen and recommended by the churches in union.

3rd. Other churches may become members of this Association by their delegates presenting certificates of their appointment, provided on examination they may be found orthodox.

4th. The Association shall organize by electing, by ballot, a Moderator and Clerk, who shall hold their appointments one associational year, and until their successors are elected, unless displaced by the Body.

5th. This Association, as an act of Christian courtesy, may invite ministers of our denomination to seats with us in council.

6th. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum which the Body is authorized to form for itself.

7th. This Association hath an inalienable right to judge what churches shall be admitted into its confederacy.

8th. The Association, thus formed, shall be regarded by us, only in the light of an advisory council, with no coercive power to "Lord it over God's heritage."

9th. This Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in its connection that shall hold corrupt doctrines or indulge in sinful or vicious practices.

10th. Every church in union, having a membership not exceeding fifty in number shall be entitled to a representation of two delegates, and one additional delegate for every increase of fifty over that number.

11th. The primary object of this Association shall be to strive for the unity of the spirit in the bonds of peace among the churches, the employment of missionaries, and to keep up the statistical accounts of the churches in its

connection and, finally, to concentrate our efforts for the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth, and for the deposition of the works of darkness.

12th. None but the members of this body shall be allowed to vote in its councils, and a majority shall decide in disposing of and settling all business that may constitutionally come before them.

13th. This Association in all cases disclaims the right, in its associate capacity, to settle church difficulties, but when a division occurs and two parties equally claim to be the church and represent themselves by letter and delegate, this Association shall have the right to decide at the first or some future meeting of its body thereafter, which party, if either, shall be recognized as the constitutional church and entitled to a seat in council.

14th. The minutes of the Association shall be read each day and corrected, if need be, by the body, and when the business shall have been completed, signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.

15th. Any Article of this Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, by a majority of two-thirds of the delegates present voting for the same.

Rules of Decorum.

1st. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2nd. The Moderator shall be deemed a judge of order, and shall have a right to call to order at any time; also it shall be his duty to see that the Rules of Order are attended to—to take the opinion of the Association on all questions properly brought before the Body.

3rd. Any member not being satisfied with his decision on any point of order, may appeal to the Association on the same day the decision is made, but at no other time.

4th. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular record of the transactions of the Association.

5th. But one person shall speak at a time, and he

shall rise to his feet and obtain leave of the Moderator, and when he has done speaking he shall sit down and shall not speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than twenty minutes at a time, unless he obtains permission of the Association.

6th. The Moderator, when addressed for leave of speech, shall signify the same, by naming of them or otherwise.

7th. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject on hand, or use words of personal reflection, or with a view of calling to order for some particular purpose. Any motion made and seconded, shall come under the consideration of the Association, except it be withdrawn by him who made it.

8th. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided before another is offered.

9th. When anything is taken up by the Association, after allowing time for the debate, the Moderator shall put the question; and those in favor of the thing proposed, shall rise to their feet; and those opposed to it shall keep their seats. The Moderator shall procure the decision before those standing take their seats.

10th. No person being a member shall depart the Association without leave of the Moderator.

11th. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in our addresses to each other.

12th. The names of the members shall be called as often as necessary.

13th. No member shall be indulged in any practice that has a tendency to interrupt in the time of a public speech, or any other practice that would dishonor the Association.

14th. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any other member, provided he appoints some other member to his seat while he is speaking, but shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the casting vote.

15th. Any member breaking these rules of order, shall be reprov'd at the discretion of the Association, but only on the day the breach is made.

Abstract of Principles.

1st. We believe in the only true and living God,—the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost—three in one.

2d. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only true rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

4th. We believe in the man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, by his own free will and holiness.

5th. We believe in the doctrine of election, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the Truth.

6th. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the merit of Jesus Christ.

7th. We believe the saints shall persevere in grace and not fall finally away.

8th. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers who have been immersed upon a profession of faith, are the only proper subjects for the Lord's table.

9th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and general judgment.

10th. We believe that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

11th. We believe that no minister has a right to the administration of the ordinances, only such as have been called of God, as was Aaron, and regularly baptized and approved of by the church and come under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery.

12th. We believe that no Presbytery is complete without two or more ordained ministers.

A Sketch of the Life of Rev. A. P. Hollifield.

We are glad that our people have not been remiss in requiring a short sketch of the life of our dear Bro. Hollifield. The good deeds and sayings of this good man of God would fill a volume if one had the space; but we must be content with only a few of them.

Rev. A. P. Hollifield was born in Cleveland county, N. C., June 25, 1848. He joined the Baptist church at Concord, Rutherford county, in 1866. He served as a deacon of this church till he was ordained to the gospel ministry in 1882.

In the year 1876 he was married to Miss Susan Walker who was a loving and an affectionate help-meet during his ministerial life. She was truly a "preacher's wife." They had seven children, two of whom, with the widow, survive him, the others having preceeded him to the grave. He died June 12, 1903.

The labors of Bro. Hollifield were chiefly confined to the churches of the King's Mountain and Sandy Run Associations. His first church was Wall's, then of the King's Mountain Association; but he afterwards supplied as pastor, at different times, the following: Zion, Bethel, Mt. Lebanon, Mt. Harmony, Big Springs, Sandy Plains, Casar, New Bethel, Pleasant Grove, Lattimore, Beaverdam, Union, Floyd's Creek and Mt. Pleasant, and perhaps others, where he preached with much success.

The services rendered by him as a preacher and pastor, and the faithfulness and zeal into which he discharged the duties assigned him in the above churches entitle him to the remembrance and respect of every living member of the said churches.

As a member of the two Associations he was prominent as a preacher and business. As a preacher he was

often appointed to preach one of the annual sermons; as a business man he was often times elected to preside over the deliberations of this Association. These duties were always discharged in a manner creditably to himself and entire satisfaction to the Association.

Bro. Hollifield loved children and the Sunday School, and they always engaged his warmest sympathy. We can not estimate the good of his influence in training the young in the paths of virtue.

There are no doubt many churches whose Sunday Schools are now blossoming and bearing rich fruits, that were wildernesses in a moral and spiritual aspect.

He had strong convictions which lead him to contend earnestly for the faith once delivered unto the saints. He took a leading part in the support of the gospel at home and abroad, and all benevolent enterprises of our people.

Bro. Hollifield's early education was somewhat limited, but his intellectual powers were of a high order. He was a diligent student, an extensive reader, and a large-hearted brother. By earnest application and constant devotion to his calling, he was recognized as one of our most useful ministers. His fine personal appearance and agreeable, social qualities added much to his attractiveness as a preacher. But the great secret of his success was his deep piety. God heard him when he prayed and the people heard him when he preached. The range of his sermons seldom fell at the feet nor over the heads of his hearers, but his earnest utterances of everybody's need of a blessed Saviour, usually reached the hearts of his congregations. It was not uncommon to see every eye suffused with tears. These gifts eminently fitted him for the "protracted meeting" service. He baptized hundreds and married many couples, but we have no means of giving anything like a correct number. His great theme was, not numbers, but that "Christ was all and in all," and in such a spirit he lived and died.

Bro. Hollifield was as widely loved as he was widely known. But with all that may be said of the good man,

he is no more, and in his death the Sandy Run Association, all his churches and Sunday Schools feel that they have sustained a great loss; but Sister Susan, his widow, visited us a few days ago, weeping at the mention of his name. We felt that hers was the greater loss never to be repaired until she went to where her husband was basking in the light of Jesus. We all could have said "amen" to the prayer that his life might have been spared, not only to his wife and boys, but that his precious gifts might be continued in the cause of his Redeemer. God knows best.

Bro. Hollifield was an affectionate husband and father, a good citizen, a warm-hearted friend, above all, a devoted Christian.

During his last illness, which was at times very painful, he showed great peace of mind and a sweet assurance of entering, through grace, into that everlasting rest.

In offering this tribute of respect to the memory of our dear Bro. Hollifield, the Association earnestly sympathizes with his widow, children, other relatives and friends; but we advise them not to sorrow and grieve as those having no hope.

While we are deprived of his presence and usefulness here, we believe that his immortal spirit is up yonder with Jesus enjoying the full fruition of everlasting joys, singing songs of praise to his Master and King.

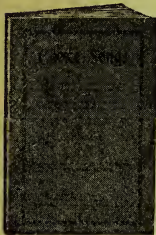

We have annual reports on Sunday School and from last year's report we find that all the churches sent re-

ports except four. if they had any schools they failed to report them. The report shows that only a little over half as many attend Sunday School as we have church members in this Association.

What then should be done to increase the attendance? We think some of the hinderances are that a many of the old people seem to think it is altogether for the young people and do not attend; forgetting the command of God to bring up the children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Other hinderances are incompetent Superintendents and Teachers. This does not require the best educated men and women but those who are filled with the love of God and have the cause at heart.

Brethren we believe that the Sunday School work is a grand work, one that none are excluded from who are able to attend. God has given evidence of his divine acceptance of this work, because nearly all who join the church come from that number who attend the Sunday Schools. REPORT OF WOMANS' MISSIONARY WORK.

For the first time in the history of the Sandy Run Association Woman's Missionary work has been officially recognized—this being the case we think it might be well to give a few figures showing the

growth of the work done by our consecrated women for the mission cause in North Carolina.

In the year 1886, (as far back as we have any record,) the Woman's Missionary Societies gave to State, Home, and Foreign Missions \$1,000.95; in 1891 \$3,128.14; in 1896 \$3,969.54; in 1901 \$9,666.36. and last year 1903, they reported 401 Societies, and raised \$11,322.95—an increase over the amount raised in 1886 of \$10,322.00. They have raised in the past 17 years a grand total of \$95,246.14. Their aim for this year is to add 100 new societies and raise \$13,000.00. Their motto would not be a bad one for us: It is—"Look up not down, out not in, and lend a hand."

Four societies in this Association (all we have), gave last year \$55.50. The same Societies have raised this year (1904) \$80.12—an increase of \$24.62 over the amount given last year.

When we think of this vast amount as having been raised by our women alone, (for we have reason to believe they have not begged it from their husbands, but have through sacrifice and hard work made this money with their own hands), we wonder what would be the condition of our different mission borders today if the men were half as much in earnest, and should make such sacrifices. We believe that the Baptist denomination could have doubled its number of Missionaries in the field to day if such were the case, and have the money to pay every one of them in full. Then let the Pastors encourage our women in this good work, and "Lend a hand."

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

The Biblical Recorder has been loyal to the Sacred trust as the organ of North Carolina Baptists. Never was the Recorder more ably edited than at present time and never has such a great opportunity provided so inspiring a field for its power. The North Carolina Baptist is accomplishing its great mission ably and effectively in advocating Baptist principals and the cause Temperance. Charity and Children has won a place among the forces which promote and maintain our denominational life. It is universally recognized.

Committee on Orphanage report:

REPORT ON THE ORPHANAGE.

Since the last session of the Association the Orphanage has suffered two severe epidemics of sickness. Last winter there were about one hundred and sixty cases of measles and twenty cases of measles and pneumonia combined, but the Lord's mercy allowed the hand of death to touch no one. In July last there appeared at the Orphanage the second case of typhoid in it's history, and since July the fever has continued to spread untill the present day, there being now more than twenty patients, in the Infirmary Building

and quite a number of convalescents at the Fleming Nursery. Two cases have been fatal.

The deep well at a cost of ten thousand dollars has been completed, and the sewage system is now being put in. When this is done, we hope that there may never recur another scourge of fever.

The Chowan Building will be complete in a few weeks. It will make room for fifty more boys. The contract has now been let for the erection of the Central Dining Hall, and we hope it will be complete and in operation by next Annual meeting. As soon as the Dining Hall is finished work will begin on the Aydlett building which will make room for forty eight more girls. The money is now in hand to erect a building to be used as a library building, which will contain a fire proof vault for the purpose of preserving orphanage documents and any other papers of Baptist interest that will be useful to future generations.

The different departments of Orphanage work have succeeded well during the past year. The farm paid a clear profit of more than two thousand dollars; the clear profit on Charity and Children was fifteen hundred dollars, and the recently established shoe shop paid a profit of seventy five dollars counting the new machinery purchased.

More than three hundred children are now being cared for at the Orphanage and if nothing hinders the progress of the work there will be four hundred inmates by the close of 1905. This increase in numbers will call for increased contributions.

On account of the scourge of fever the Orphanage is now sorely in need of immediate extra contributions. We hope the Association will take a generous contribution for the Orphanage following the reception of this report. Respectfully submitted, G. P. Harrill, Oscar Bridges, T. C. Harris.

Committee on Education report:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The subject of education is one of vital importance, and is claiming more attention at present than in all the ages past. The demand for educated men and women is increasing daily; and yet there are so few people that really know what education is. therefore I desire to quote from the Universal Dictionary. "The original means to bring out, to educate properly the educating, leading out, or drawing out the latent powers of an individual. From the philosophic point every one is educated, his powers being developed for good or evil by all he sees, hears, feels or does. Education in this sense begins when one enters the world, and continues all the time he is in it." This being true, the parent is anxious, or should be, and employs teach-

ers and professors to draw out the intellectuals and moral endowments, encouraging what is good to ourself and society, and discouraging what is harmful. We as a Baptist people should encourage the training of our people for the occupation by which he deserves or is likely to support himself in life. This necessitates a system of elementary day schools for the multitude, of secondary or high schools for a smaller number and colleges for those that are able to go beyond the high school.

For spiritual and moral purposes these appliances are supplemented by Sunday Schools and churches that every age may be taught. We urge that our people go forward with education.

Committee on State Mission report :

Your Committee on State Missions is glad to report the work in good condition and making splendid progress. About one hundred Missionaries in the field official work and yet there is much room for other labors. So we feel with reference to our State the Harvest truly is Great and the labors are few. Instead of one hundred Missionaries we need three time that amount or more. Let us pray the Lord of the harvest to send more laborers and do all we can to help them. We recommend that the association endeavor to raise not less than three hundred dollars for State Missions, in order that we may possess the State for Christ at the earliest possible day. We call special attention to the bible work being done by the State board in Western North Carolina. A meeting from ten to fifteen days in each association as far as possible to study the bible.

Those schools are especially for Pastor's but are equally helpful to Superintendent and teachers and all those who desire to study the word. We heartily recommend this work and urge the Brethern to take advantage of it. This work is now in charge of

Committee on Home Mission report :

That our Home Mission board in its work in the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention is enlarging in all the departments of the work and while these enlarged results are very encouraging for almost every point where the Gospel is being preached under the direction of the Home Board there is increased interest in the work. Thus the interest manifested by the unregenerate appeals to us for enlarged contribution to this great work. But you ask who are those with whom the Home Board are laboring and where do they live. Some of them are our own loved ones who have gone to the West and North West ; and those who have immigrated from other countries, also the Indians and negroes and in

the Island of Cuba and some work in the Philippines.

The Home Board is not only preaching the gospel to heathens in these parts but we are helping to build and establish schools and aiding those that are established. Often we hear the question asked do Home Mission pay? We want to answer that by asking: "Does the gospel pay?" If it does then the Home Mission does. We find by referring to the records of our churches there is only one conversion for every \$15.00 paid our pastors while there is about one for every \$12.00 paid our Home Missionaries. So let us increase our contributions.

Committee on Foreign Mission Report:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIGNS.

The command of our Lord to preach the Gospel to every creature was his last message to men. They were to begin preaching at Jerusalem, but to go to the utmost part of the earth.

Satan has always opposed Foreign Mission work—when he cannot keep God's servants from going to the heathen, he has tried to prevent their success in it. The work of Southern Baptists has been blessed wonderfully. In 1840 we had but one missionary, today we have 138, In 1898 there were 193 native and foreign workers on our Mission fields, To-day there are 353, Then

there were reports of 701 baptisms. The were 2076 roported last year.

Our Missions occupy the strategic centers and countries of Missionary operation. They represent the centers of population and influence in heathen lands.

Finances—The board does its work on an economical business method. The cost of the Board's work is less than 6 per cent of the funds collected so that about 94 cents of every dollar collected by it goes to the Missionaries employed by them. God has blessed and enlarged the influence of the Board's work. Our Secretaries have for years reported "no debt" to the convention thereby showing the business management effective and trustworthy.

The Board has Missionaries in China, Africa, Japan, Italy, Brazil Mexico and Argentina. The advancement of the work on a basis of 25 per cent means that we must give 25 per cent more money. Our people need information. The Biblical Recorder, the North Carolina Baptist and the Foreign Mission Journal furnish the information needed. Let us encourage our people to read them and to contribute more liberally to the support of this work.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

Committee on Ministerial Support Report :

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL SUPPORT.

The Bible clearly teaches us that every church should have the Gospel preached. Christ's custom was to enter in the synagogue on the Sabbath day and teach. We are taught that every church should have its own pastor, and that every church should elect its own pastor, who should meet the church at least on Sunday. The Bible directs as to the support of the Pastor. The Apostles said, "We will give ourselves continually to prayer and to the ministry of the word Acts, 6,-4: Paul says to Timothy, "Meditate upon these things; give thyself wholly to them that thy profiting may appear to all," 1st, Tim., 4,-15. The disciples had depended on their ministry for support, many ministered of their substance, Luke. 8,-13, that they had

money to buy such things as they had need, John 8.-29 Paul says, "If we have sown unto you spiritual things, is it a great thing if we shall reap your carnal things." Paul also says, Even so both the Lord ordained that they which preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel 1st, Cor., 9-11-15.

The agreement of the Apostle in conclusion that he that preaches the gospel has a right to claim a support from those who receive his ministrations for he says, "The laborer is worthy of his hire."

It is established from the scriptures that the pastor must be supported by the church to which he preaches, and should be so equalized that some be not burdened and others eased, but that there shall be equality. 2 Cor. 8.-13-14. A church should meet together and determine what each member can and will pay before the pastor is called. One reason why so many of our churches do not prosper, is that so many of our preachers have to be hindered on the account of finances. What is promised to a pastor should be promptly paid. No honest man will promise what he does not intend to pay. According to the Spirit of the Gospel the church is a mutual insurance company. Should a brother subscribe and obstinately refuse to pay, he should have the charge of dishonesty preferred against him and be excluded. From the reports of the letters we feel that our people ought to read the scriptures and inform themselves as to their duty on pastoral support.

WE HAVE been informed that there are Baptist Sunday schools which have yielded to the solicitations, personal and otherwise, of an undenominational publishing house, and which are taking, in whole or in part, the literature of that house in preference to the literature of their own Publication Society. EDUCATION REPORT.

Baptists for two hundred and fifty years have been the leaders and largest investors in educational plants and endowments. A quickened educational conscience is a thing of slow growth, but it is growing among us. The claims of the Gospel we admit. The demand that character conform to belief we concede. The call to Missions we now regard as imperative. Christian benevolence is given a place in our budget. But Christian Education must be joined with these as a rightful claimant to our thought and means. Education should have some recognition in every church. The pastors should teach the people the responsibility of the church for the training of its children, the type of education needed, the duty of the home as an aid in education, the place of religion and morals in a balanced scheme of popular instruction, and the merits and claims of our Baptist institutions as factors in the plan. Our denominational schools are our mills for producing a Baptist brand of Christian manhood

and womanhood. We need Christian workers in our churches who are neither preachers or missionaries, but who are educated Baptist gentlemen and ladies. The church has a vital interest in our schools and colleges, for to them it must look for its ministry, and many of its cultured and consecrated workers. Let us lead the people to consider the importance of Christian education, and should, by stirring appeals from the pulpit to the people, arouse parents to a sense of their sublime obligation to educate their children, and inspire youth to nobler things and send them away to school, already with bright visions of future usefulness. It is further the duty of every church, out of whose ranks the Lord is "sending forth laborers into this harvest, to urge the young licentiate preacher to equip himself for the great work of preaching the gospel by securing the most thorough education possible.

Whereas, The location selected by the Trustees of this Association is convenient to members of the Sandy Run Association therefore

Resolved, That the Moderator of this body appoint a committee of five to attend the next session of the Sandy Run Association and extend an invitation to that body to co-operate with this Association in the erection and operation of the school now under way.

Resolved second, That said Association be requested to appoint such a Board or Committee, as in its judgment may seem best, to co-operate with its Board of Trustees heretofore appointed by this body for the erection and operation of said school which shall be known as the school of the two Associations.

Resolution introduced by J. M. Goode:

Resolved 1st, That we endorse the resolution sent up by the King's Mountain Association.

2nd. That we elect a board of Trustees consisting of ten to operate with the Trustees of the King's Mountain Association in building and operating said school.

After remarks by C. J. Woodson, J. V. Devenney, J. Y. Hamrick, J. F. Alexander, H. D. Harrill the report of the trustees was adopted and the resolutions were passed.

ORPHANAGE REPORT.

Last year when the Association was in session the Orphanage was in the midst of a scourge of fever, in all there being 98 cases. We are glad to report that there were only two deaths from fever during the year. A fire destroyed the large and convenient barn and stables, a quantity of hay, corn, potatoes, machinery, and five head of horses which alone were worth nine hundred dollars. A hail storm has injured the crop on the farm about one fourth. The deep well, the sewerage system, the central dining hall, and the Chowan building have all been completed since the last session of this body. Rev. M. L. Kesler, a native of Iredell county, and pastor of the Morganton church has been called to succeed Rev. J. B. Boone as General Manager of the Orphanage. Bro. Kesler takes charge of the Orphanage

with a debt of eleven thousand dollars. This debt would discourage him possibly, if there were not one hundred and eighty-four thousand Baptist hearts ready to help him cancel it. Other Associations have been asked and consented to raise their pledges fifty per cent for the next year. The King's Mountain Association raised their pledges sixty per cent: There are now 316 children at the Orphanage.

5th, That each school send full reports to the Association so that the Sunday School table in the Minutes may contain complete statistics.

6th, That we commend the work of the Sunday School Convention in the bounds of this Association on each fifth Sunday which devotes its time entirely to the consideration of Sunday School topics and the unifying of our Sunday School forces.

7th, That we heartily endorse the Sunday School department of the Baptist State Convention, that we recognize Sunday School Missions as one of our regular objects of benevolence and that we pledge ourselves to contribute toward its maintenance and enlargement.

HOME MISSION REPORT.

The magnitude and importance of the work of the Home Mission Board cannot be overestimated. It, like State Missions underlies everything else. As we help it we aid every other enterprise for which we are expending money. The work done by this Board can never be fully estimated as it has paved the way for the success of the cause in many of the states and territories under its jurisdiction. Some of our most important towns were aided by it in its past history viz: Raleigh, Wilmington and Asheville.

The work it has done in saving to us the mountain schools is of incalculable benefit. Its work in Texas, Oklahoma, Indian Territory, Louisiana and Cuba is far reaching in results and the report of the work for the past conventional year is gratifying to a high degree. We employed in the past conventional year 718 missionaries who reported 10,551 baptisms and 10,019 accessions by letter, making a grand total of 20,570 additions to the churches. For this work the states

contributed \$137,578.37 and from other legacies and other sources was received \$8,126.94, making a gain over the previous year of \$12 147.31. The work done is itself a great inspiration to us to enlarge it and push it forward with more zeal and vigor. We could use a half million dollars in this important work.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

"Go into all the world· teach all nations," was the command of our Lord and Master. Many years this command was not heeded although in our day a spirit of activity in obedience to it is evident, yet it seems that the work has not been pushed as the need required, for to us it seems that God Himself has come down to help us do His Holy will in preaching to all nations. Can there be any doubt in the hearts of his children that it is He who directs the way of the many foreigners in heathen lands to hear the word and obey the command as it is given by His messengers and the results are encouraging as we note the increase in contributions, we also note the increase in blessings in every field and department of our work. We now have Foreign Missionaries in seven different fields or countries and we see also the blessings of God upon them all as we can see by the growth of our work in ten years.

The fields are China, Japan, Africa, Italy, Mexico, Brazil and Argentina. On these fields we give figures of 1895 and 1905. Then we had 91 missionaries, now 181, then 85 churches on the fields now 194, then 22 church buildings now 132, then 1503 Sunday School scholars now 5,496, then 581 baptisms for the year, this year 2,231, then a total membership of 5498 after fifty year's work now 11,428, then the contributions for the year was \$105,435.02, this year it is \$283,415.88. So you see by calculating that while the contributions have doubled the baptisms have quadrupled. So as God has so abundantly blessed us, we must go forward with increased contributions asking Divine guidance in this great work.

STATE MISSION REPORT.

In 1830 the Baptist State Convention was organized, for the primary purpose of evangelizing North Carolina. At its first session a Board of Managers was appointed to look after the Mission work of the State. The Board of Managers was soon changed to the State Mission Board and under that name is doing the same work that the Board of Managers did.

We cannot know all the direct results of State Missions because statistics have not been kept. In 1882 for the first time the missionaries were organized to give statistical reports. From that time till the present, these reports have been carefully recorded and preserved. From these records we get the following facts in regard to the work for the last twenty two years:

Number baptized by Missionaries.....	27,605
Number new churches organized.....	754
Number houses of worship built.....	746
Amount paid for church buildings.....	\$114,061.74
Sunday Schools organized.....	742

There are in the State 1,792 Baptist churches. Seven hundred and fifty four—nearly three sevenths of these—were organized by the Missionaries of the Board within the last twenty two years. The indirect results eternally alone can reveal.

A great deal yet remains to be done. "There is very much land yet to be possessed." There are five counties in the state with one preacher to the county, and that one would not be there were he not supported, in large part, by the Board. There are four county seats in no one of which is there a Baptist church or a Baptist preacher. Many new towns are yet unoccupied and are making urgent appeals

to the Board. Many of the towns which the Board aided in establishing the first church, are now asking aid for two or three mission points. "Let us go up and possess the land, for we are abundantly able to possess it." L. Johnson for the Committee.

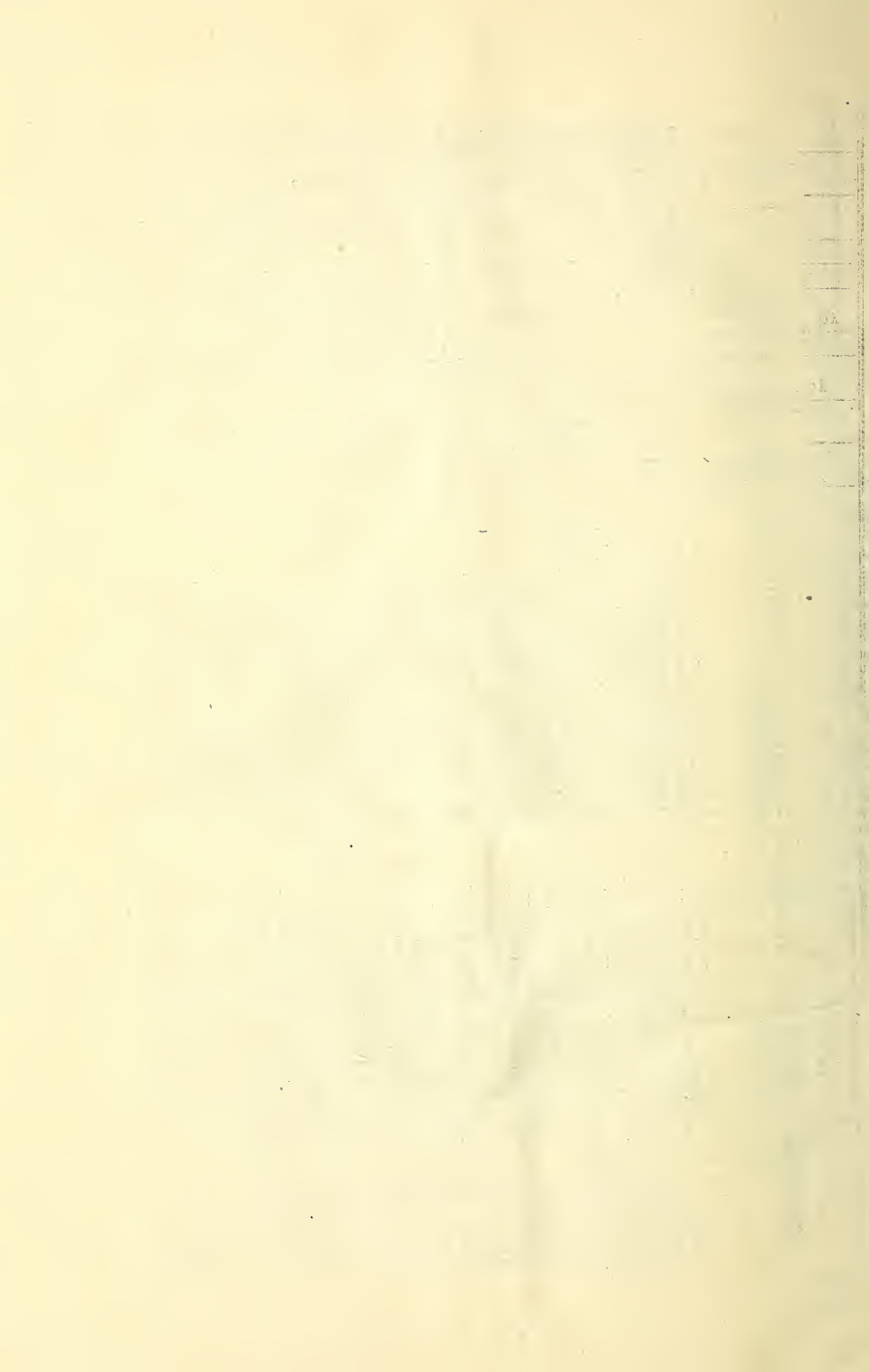

WE HAVE been informed that there are Baptist Sunday schools which have yielded to the solicitations, personal and otherwise, of an undenominational publishing house, and which are taking, in whole or in part, the literature of that house in preference to the literature of their own Publication Society. In view of this information we desire to put the question, *Is it wise?* to pastors, Sunday school officers and teachers who may have been thus influenced.

Is it wise to put into the hands of Baptist children and youth a literature which in some parts is largely sensational, in other parts directly opposed to Baptist teaching, and in no part clearly and positively declarative of our distinctive denominational views? What sort of Baptists will the next generation be if the youth of this generation are brought up on a merely negative or an essentially Pedobaptist literature, and are never taught in the Sunday school the truths for which our fathers were ready to suffer and which form the only ground for our denominational existence? And how are young people to be brought to Christ, and developed into stalwart Christians, if the aim in the literature employed is mainly to gratify a craving for the sensational and not to instruct and fortify against errors in doctrine and life?

With the cheapness of newspapers today, every family, though they be poor, can have them. Every family ought to have at least one good religious newspaper in the home, and the more the better, if you read them. You remember that Paul wrote to a young preacher, give attention to reading. Good reading furnishes the nourishment necessary to intellectual and spiritual growth. The great men of the age are men who read. Therefore, we would recommend to our people, with the Bible to read, the Biblical Recorder, the organ of the Baptist State Convention, to see what we are doing in the State; Charity and Children, to know what our people are doing at our orphanage; Foreign Mission Journal, to keep ourselves posted in the Foreign Mission work, and the Home Field, to keep better posted in the work of the Southern Baptist Convention, and also the North Carolina Baptist, which may be helpful to know more of the temperance cause in the State.

J. M. Goode read the following report on Education:

Report on Education.

The people of our State, as well as the people of sister Southern States, are awakening speedily to a full realization of their possibilities as part of a great nation and civilization—especially their possibilities industrially, commercially, politically and educationally. This awakening means a great blessing in the way of prosperity provided true education keeps pace with, or goes in advance of the awakening on other lines, if it does not, doubtless the result will prove disastrous. By true education, we mean such education as will impress a people deeply with their responsibility to God and as they awake along other lines, bring to bear strongly upon them their responsibilities in the Master's cause; such education as will make them, when they shall have grown prosperous, strong and influential, use that prosperity, power and influence, effectively good.

We hasten to say that our people are in the midst of an educational awakening and that the movement for better educational facilities inaugurated in North Carolina half a decade ago is already bearing fruit richly. From one end of the State to the other the need of education is being urged by our leaders, and in a great measure is being responded to upon the part of our people.

True it is that we should redouble our efforts in behalf of education in general in order that the educational spirit may not only keep pace with, but go in advance of the spirit of progress in other lines.

We hardly need stop to say we Baptist to keep pace with

the times must educate, there is a higher motive, and yet let us say that other denominations are striving to educate. They are building schools and urging the need of education upon their people.

Two statements made recently by Baptist leaders show how great the need that as a denomination we educate our people: One said, speaking of the South and its new development, that the South holds the future; the other, speaking of the immigration and its tendency said this, and the importance of meeting them with the Gospel, said the world's Baptist strong hold is in the South, and if the Baptists loose out in the South, the Baptist cause has lost out. If these statements are true, we as a denomination must educate.

Schools, seminaries, colleges and universities are our best and only means of thorough training. Why then should we hesitate to build high schools and support seminaries, colleges and universities.

We bespeak for Wake Forest College a place in every Baptist's heart, for there true Christian educators labor, training our young men for service in the Lord's work. Beside Wake Forest, let our Baptist Female University, at Raleigh, have a place in your heart. For such other Baptist schools as Mars Hill for boys and girls, and Oxford Seminary for girls, we bespeak your support. And lastly, we would lay heavily upon the heart of every member of the Sandy Run Association our Associational High School at Boiling Springs, material for which is being prepared and laid on the ground. Remember, Brethren, as the twig is bent so the tree is inclined. Let us prepare that the bending of our twigs may be done for God through the Baptist cause.

Report of Board of Trustees of the Associational High School.

The Board of Trustees of the Associational High School reports a year of steady progress. On October 27th, 1905, the joint board of the two Associations met at Boiling Springs and a basis of co-operation was agreed upon whereby the Board shall consist of twenty-five members, fifteen to be elected by the King's Mountain Association and ten to be elected by the Sandy Run.

The Boiling Springs High School, Incorporated, has been selected as the legal title of the proposed institution, and a liberal charter has been secured from the State and placed on record in the office of the Clerk of the Court at Shelby. Deeds have been secured and recorded to 8.6 acres of land at Boiling Springs, including the old church building.

At a meeting of the Board held on November 13th, last, action

was taken looking to the erection of a commodious brick building. Plans have been made out and material is being secured for said building. The estimated cost of which is about fifteen thousand dollars—less than one dollar and fifty cents per member for the membership of the two Associations.

For the accomplishment of this work subscriptions have been secured aggregating \$6,716.67. Of this amount \$2,207.20 has been collected to date. This September 20th, 1906.

We are satisfied from what has been done in the Home Mission field that it is enough to convince every thinking Baptist, in all this South land, that Home Mission is a grand and glorious work. This mission was organized in 1845, 61 years ago, and began its work by sending missionaries into all the destitute places in the Southern States and Cuba. A number of those places now have become self-sustaining, still there remains much to be done yet. It is said that over half of the Baptist of the world live in the bounds of the Home Mission Board. Also one tenth of the people of this South land are Baptist. This should encourage us to go forward in the work of the Lord. He hath done great things for us whereof we should be glad. The Lord has blessed us in temporal things as well as spiritual, so we are able now to do great things for Him, will we do it? The Home Mission Board has under its charge 838 white missionaries and 42 negroes; baptized for the year 15,436. This Board also is aiding in what is called the Mountain Schools, eight of which belong to this State with an enrollment of 1415 students, that is all we receive now.

The Convention at Chattanooga last May instructs the Board to

send an evangelist with as many associates as are necessary to labor in this home field. As we belong to the Southern Baptist Convention let us do our part in this noble work for God.

Report on Foreign Missions.

"The Pharisees and Scribes murmured, saying: This man receiveth sinners and eateth with them."

In answer to this charge Jesus spake the parable of the lost sheep, of the piece of silver, and of the prodigal son, showing his great love for a lost soul. If he loved one so much, how great must be His love for a lost world? If we must leave the ninety and nine to go after the one, how much more necessary to go after the millions?

We have never had greater opportunities than now. More effectual doors are being opened to us daily in the heathen lands. Often as these remarks have been made, they are fraught with greater meaning than ever before in modern times. Since the day when God began to bless the labors of His servants in heathen countries, Christian hearts have rejoiced over the results of the efforts put forth to bring the lost to Christ. Who that is in touch with the work and knows the results, can but exalt in praise to God.

But while we are rejoicing in what has been done, we would have you remember that very, very much remains to be done. The opening of new fields and the giving of greater opportunities, only lays upon us more heavily the weight of responsibility to give all nations the gospel. Japan seems to-day destined to lead and dictate in eastern nations. She stands as a great field white unto harvest. To give the gospel to Japan is to give it to the Orient. China, also, is a field that cannot be neglected without serious loss. Time fails us to speak of other parts that need help.

There is great need that our force of foreign workers be largely

reinforced at once. From almost every field there comes the cry for more preachers, teachers or physicians. We should not only pray God to send forth more laborers, but we should, as individuals and churches, largely increase our gifts that there may be money in the Lord's treasure to support the new workers. Some of us have prayed and given so little that we hardly have a right to claim a share in the results. Let us go forward. Under the pure full light of the gospel we are called upon to act and live. Bright and glorious is the day before us; white and full are the fields that await us; girded and strong are the companions who will go with us; beautiful shall be our feet upon the mountain. The state of the world is such, and so much depends upon action that a voice seems to call aloud to us, "Do something—do something for Foreign Missions."

Report on Ministerial Support.

This is all wrong and directly contrary to the teaching of the Word of God. Every member should not only feel it a duty, but esteem it a privilege to give something, however small, to the support of the ministry.

In the first place if Pastors, when receiving members into their churches, either by letter or for baptism, will faithfully instruct each and every one fully upon the duties of members in supporting the church in all its obligations—the Ministry, Missions, Orphanage, etc.—in fact let them know that they are expected to contribute something to all the different objects for which our churches stand, the time will soon come when the ministers of the Sandy Run Association will be more liberally supported, and our churches will startle the world with their contributions to Missions, and all other charitable objects.

Let the Deacons follow this up, making it a point to see each and every member of their churches and impress it upon them that it is a duty and an obligation we owe to God and to our fellowman, to support the Ministry and send the Gospel to those who have it not;

letting them know at the same time that we are deeply interested in their spiritual welfare and growth. Special sermons should be preached to new converts immediately after each revival, or whenever new converts have been received into the church.

Our Baptist people, particularly, are very much in need of good sound doctrine right along this line, and if the Pastors and Deacons of every church will do their full duty the rising generation will be noted for its liberality.

Of course, it is understood that the Ministry should receive our sympathies and prayers at all times. We should stand by our preachers in all their efforts to carry forward the Lord's Work.

Report on Ministerial Relief.

We should realize that our obligation to support the ministers of the gospel does not cease when the minister has become, by old age or poor health, unable to preach. The men who laid the foundations on which we build should not be forgotten nor neglected. There are now possibly thirty who receive small aid from the Board. No one of them is given over \$8.00 per month.

The Board that manages this part of our work is located in Durham and receives no pay for its work. Sixty-six per cent of the money received by them is paid to the ministers under the care of the Boards, and thirty-three per cent is set aside for a permanent fund. This is done that the work may be self-supporting by and by.

More should receive help from this Board than does and all should have more liberal help. This can be done by the churches increasing their contributions. Pastors, tell your people about this work and its needs. Laymen, respond to the call of the Board.

Report on State Missions.

Surely the evangelization of our own State is something that should appeal to all our churches. In contributing to State Missions a church is making a contribution to every object of the Convention, because the work of State Missions lies at the foundation of all our denominational enterprises. Last year \$30,000 was raised by the churches for State Missions and the Board employed 140 missionaries who labored in 40 different associations with the result that 1,500 happy converts were baptized and 1,000 letters were gleaned from the fields, making in all 2,500 additions to our Mission Churches. Surely God has set the seal of His approval upon our State Mission work.

The need is greater every year. The time will never come when we can let up on State Missions since the population of the State is increasing faster than the church membership. The opportunities were never so great as they are to-day. Wide open doors confront us. The expenditure of few hundred dollars in several exceedingly important places just now would establish the cause of these points while if we lose this opportunity, it may be forever too late after this. We earnestly recommend that our churches during this associational year increase their contributions to State Mission.

Report on Baptist Orphanage.

Our Orphanage at Thomasville has been saving the helpless and destitute for twenty-one years. More than nine hundred children have been cared for.

There is the farm, containing four hundred acres of land, which gives helpful work to many boys. Our buildings are worth \$60,000, the farm \$15,000, and an invested fund which amounts to \$102,000. We have 325 children now in the Orphanage. The expense is \$60.00 per day. This calls for larger gifts.

Charity and Children now have 11,000 subscribers, and turns a neat sum into the current expense fund. Every Sunday School should take a club of ten or more. This is the best thing a school can do for the Orphanage. There are only 365 schools in the State which give a monthly collection to the Orphanage. We recommend that every Sunday School in the Sandy Run Association give one collection each month to the Orphanage. The shoe shop turns out 1,000 pairs of shoes per annum, and should be enlarged. The excellent steam laundry just installed is a great blessing, for cleanliness is near to Godliness. We should be proud of our past efforts, take courage and press on to make the Thomasville Orphanage the greatest in America.



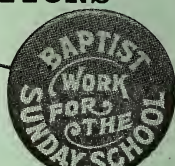

STATE MISSIONS.

The State Mission Board began its work seventy-seven years ago. The results amply justify the wisdom of our fathers in this great undertaking. Accurate statistics were not given by the Missionaries until 1882, just twenty-five years ago.

From these statistics are gathered the following interesting figures:

Number baptized by our Missionaries.....	31,179
Churches organized on Mission fields.....	787
Houses of Worship built on Mission fields.....	735
Amount paid for building houses on Mission fields	\$156,313.08
Sunday Schools organized by Missionaries.....	873

There are in the State 1821 Missionary Baptist churches. Seven hundred and eighty-seven, three-sevenths of these were organized by the Missionaries of the board, within the last twenty-two years. It would be entirely safe to say that at least half the Baptist churches in North Carolina were organized by the Missionaries of the Board. It is no exaggeration to claim that two-thirds of the money that comes into the Lord's treasury for our general work, comes from churches that were organized by or were beneficiaries of our board. Last year fifty-eight churches gave each one hundred dollars or over to Foreign Missions. Of these, forty-four are churches that have been aided by the Board, leaving only fourteen that had not been aided. Five churches gave last year \$500 or more, each to Foreign Missions, and every one of these five were founded or fostered by the board. It will be seen by these facts, that in the work of State Missions, we have been laying the foundation for the enlargement of every department of our work.

As much as has been done, much remains to be done. A large area of rich, virgin soil remains untouched. There are five counties in the State with only one resident Baptist pastor to the county, and that one would not be there were he not supported in large measure

by the Board. There are four county seats in no one of which is there a Baptist church or a Baptist preacher. Many towns are yet unoccupied, and are making urgent appeals to the Board for help. Many of the towns which the Board aided in establishing the first church, are now asking help for one or more Mission points. This is due to the rapid growth of many of our towns.

A great door of opportunity stands before the Baptists of North Carolina, and State Missions is the key that can unlock that door. A dollar put in State Missions at many points to-day, will be worth as much as ten dollars will be ten years from now.

Let us increase our contributions to State Missions.

So, brethren, do let us try severly to do justice to these noble and interesting things which are so important to our advancement.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

We are glad to report a lively interest in Education everywhere. Potently and, we think lasting, has educational revival swept from one end of the State to the other, effecting all classes, until almost all of our institutions of learning are full to overflowing. To present a discussion, therefore, on education, or our duty to educate, seems to your committee to be superfluous. We shall deal more with schools than with education.

Wake Forest College under the wise and efficient administration of Dr. Poteat is easily at the front and just as prosperous as can be with its present endowment and accommodations.

The Baptist University for Women, with our own scholarly and devout Dr. Vann at its head, has so soon won a warm place in the hearts of our people and stands breast to breast with the first colleges of the South for the education of young women. "Present success is ever the reward of labor and sacrifice, and in turn, calls for larger things to be won by similar means." Therefore, we must increase Wake Forest endowment and stand close by the University that they may be able to fulfill their God-given destiny.

Oxford Female Seminary and Chowan Institute deserve honorable mention. Nor should we pass unnoticed at least eighteen schools of the accademic and high school class that are doing good work and supplying a long felt want. With possibly one exception, all of these

schools have opened their fall terms with about thirty per cent. increase enrollment. Brethren, while we remember and help the higher institutions let us not forget nor neglect these secondary ones for they very largely reach a class that will never be reached by Wake Forest and the University. The Boiling Springs High School is the joint property of the King's Mountain and Sandy Run Associations. A complete report of this school will be presented by the trustees. The first session opened with about fifty students a large part of whom are boarding students. Let us take this school upon our hearts and give it a share in our prayers. When we see the boys and girls who yearly leave these two Associations to attend school elsewhere, we can begin to realize how great is the need for Boiling Springs High School.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BOILING SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL, INCORPORATED.

The Board of Trustees of the Associational High School at a meeting held on January 1st, 1907, believing that the interest shown in the undertaking and the subscriptions then in hand, about ten thousand dollars, justified such action, unanimously instructed their Building Committee to proceed with the work of building according to the plans heretofore adopted.

In compliance with these instructions a contract was entered into with Mr. D. P. Queen for the erection of the building at a total cost of six thousand dollars, the committee to furnish all material and the contractor to perform the necessary labor. The work was commenced the latter part of March under the direction of the chairman of the committee, and carried forward rapidly up to May 25, 1907. At a meeting of the Board of Trustees held on that date it was found that collections, while remarkably good, were not sufficient to pay for material and at the same time meet the pay-rolls of the contractor. The suggestion was made that a joint note be executed by members of the Board and a loan of three thousand dollars be secured, which sum might be used to supplement collections and put the building under roof without delay. The loan was negotiated as indicated. At the same time the services of Mr. J. D. Huggins were secured as Field Agent until such time as might be deemed wise to open school when he should be employed as teacher in the institution. At the same meeting also Mr. John F. Moore was appointed to superintend the erection of the building in order that the chairman of the building

committee might give his entire time to the performance of his duties as financial agent.

At a subsequent meeting, July 25th, 1907, it was arranged to secure an additional loan of five thousand dollars with which to carry on the work. The Board at the same meeting decided to have school open about October 1st, of the present year, and Prof. J. D. Huggins was chosen principal with the privilege of selecting additional teachers.

The south wing of the building is ready for the roof timbers. It is estimated that about one hundred thousand bricks are yet to be laid on the walls of the center and north wings.

The subscriptions for the work to date amount to \$10824.34, while the collections from all sources to date amount to \$6036.12.

It would be desirable in some respects to be able to present a statement showing the exact amount collected from the membership of each church in the two Associations co-operating in this enterprise but collections have been reported in such shape that this is not possible.

ORPHANAGE.

The Baptist people of North Carolina under the good hand of God is the only source of supply to which the Orphanage can look. Our people have always provided the daily bread for the children, and this burden will always rest upon them.

More than four hundred Sunday Schools are setting apart one Sunday in each month as Orphanage day, and taking a collection for

the institution. This has proved a wonderful blessing to the Orphanage. We recommend that every church in the Sandy Run Association adopt this rule. "Set apart one Sunday in each month for Orphanage day, and contribute as liberal as possible."

A shoe shop, employing a half dozen lads, turns out nine hundred pairs of shoes a year which turn into the treasury a large revenue for the general support.

Bro. Venable Wilson, a capable workman and a consecrated christian has charge of the shoe shop.

The office of Charity and Children is a busy place. It furnishes employment for a number of the boys, where they are taught the useful and practical art of type-setting. From this office many boys have gone who are now holding honorable and responsible places in different sections of the State.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

Temperance in the general acceptation of the term means the use of things in moderation. As applied to intoxicating liquor it is a misnomer, as we could with equal propriety speak of the temperate use of opium, morphine or cocaine. Liquor has done for America what opium has done for China. In the State of Massachusetts where a record of all crimes are made and those traceable to liquor it has been ascertained that running through a period of twenty years that 84 per cent. of the crime committed was from liquor. Judge Pritchard asserted recently that nine-tenths of the crime committed in Asheville was from the saloons.

It has been ascertained by investigation that 75 per cent. of the inmates in our penitentiary, and also that 75 per cent. of the orphans in our asylums are there from liquor.

As a crime producer and peace disturber the liquor traffic is without a paralel in this country. The loss caused to business in the many departments of labor and industry, is immeasurable, and added to wreck and ruin of homes and the pauperism curtailed upon the country, to say nothing of the burden imposed upon the tax payers incident to court expenses would make a volume in dollars and cents annually appalling to behold.

We condemn the licensed system of public saloons as a crime against the citizenship and moral dignity of the State.

We favor both the abolition of the liquor traffic by legislative enactment to our constitution, forever debarring the manufacture and sale of the accursed stuff in our State, and to this end urge our people everywhere and at all times to use their utmost endeavors to secure it.

We rejoice in the transaction of the new state of Ocklahoma in adopting a constitution by over forty thousand majority forever debarring the liquor traffic from their midst. We also rejoice in the noble stand of Georgia in putting out of that State by legislative enactment the licensed saloons. After January 1st there will be only 29 counties in North Carolina where liquor is sold under license or by a dispensary. Let us hasten the day when North Caralina shall come into line and take her rightful place as a free state from the liquor traffic and cleanse her skirts from the crime of the saloon.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The report of our Foreign Mission Board shows contributions to the work during last year amounting to \$315,248.48 against \$283,415.80 the preceding year, and \$247,629.69 two years before; an average increase of 12½ per cent.

There were 2,445 baptisms last year against 2,231 the previous year. These were the largest contributions in the history of our work and the number of baptisms was greater than ever resulted from our labors in a single year. The success and prosperity of our Foreign Mission effort no less than its pressing needs, warrant and demand a large and steady advance in the movement. Ours is a world-wide religion. Upon every continent on the face of the earth there are Baptist churches, and Brethren of our faith are to be found holding high the standard of the Lord Jesus.

Nearly every nation is now open to the messenger of God, and conditions all over the world are favorable to the Gospel message. While men are seeking the Truth is our opportunity under God of giving it to them. The end in view is the redemption of the world from the power of sin, through the preaching of the Gospel of Christ. The Foreign Mission Board has inaugurated a Missionary Education movement designed to stimulate and aid a careful study of Mission work. Bro. T. B. Wray has been appointed Secretary and put in charge of the work. Its expenses have been provided and no demand is made for contributions for its support. \$35,000 is the mark set for Foreign Missions this year in our State. We are delighted to see by reference to the Digest of Letters that the Sandy Run Association has this year increased its contributions to Foreign Missions by 25 per cent., and this without the use of any high pressure methods. Our people are coming to know their duty and the Lord is making them willing servants of His. Respectfully submitted.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

The Board that administers this department of our work is located in Durham, N. C., and receives no pay for its services. Rev. C. J. Thompson is President and J. F. McDuffie is Corresponding Secretary of the Board. In their report to the State Convention last year we find the following statement: "The hopeful outlook for the work of this Board is very encouraging. The increased contributions and the increased number of beneficiaries admitted on the Board, are marked indications of a growing interest and progress. We take courage and go forward." We get also from the same report the following figures: There are thirty-one families represented on the Board. No one of these receives more than \$95 and no one less than \$17.50 per year. Two-thirds of all funds received by the Board are paid directly to the beneficiaries of the Board and one-third is put down as a permanent interest bearing fund and only the accruing interest used.

This Association last year contributed to this object \$17.23, this year we have paid \$47.18, making a gain of \$29.95. This is very encouraging. But let us still go forward. Brother Pastors, take occasion at least once within the year to lay the needs of this work upon the hearts of your people.

MINISTERIAL SUPPORT.

This is a subject that should attract the attention of all christians much more than it does, for it is a certain fact that our ministers of the Gospel gets the smallest remuneration of all laborers. Brick masons, mechanics, house carpenters, and even down to the farm la-

borers gets twice as much as they did fifteen years ago, but as a general rule, especially in our country churches, the ministers of the Gospel gets but little more than they did fifteen years ago. We are living in an age of enlightenment and education, and our ministers have to study much harder to prepare for preaching than our forefathers did. There are but few churches, if any, that some of their people knows good preaching from sorry preaching. Therefore our ministers are compelled to prepare their sermons or be criticized. Brethren, the great wonder is that our ministers accomplish as much as they do with the little pittance of a salary that they get. There is no doubt but that many a poor humble minister's reputation is spoiled because his people did not pay him enough to meet his obligations for the necessaries of life. Brethren, these things ought not to be. We ought by all means to loose ther hands so that they could live above reproach, and give their whole time to the study and preaching of Jesus Christ. So, Brethren, if we live to meet in another Association, let every church report 50 per cent. increase on their pastor's salary.

WOMAN'S MISSIONS

We find the women in our churches, where they are organized, are doing a great work for Missions—Home, State and Foreign, and not only are they at work but they have put our male membership to thinking, and in consequence of this spirit our churches generally, wherever you find a consecrated band of women, are largely increasing their contributions; and with very few exceptions, the churches that give most have a well organized Woman's Missionary Society. If this is true, and we believe the statistics will bear us out in the above statement, then should not we, as churches, encourage our women in this great and good work?

Take the Society at Caroleen, for instance, and we find that they contributed last year \$44.10, while this year they have reached the sum of \$95.24, a gain of \$51.14. The Caroleen church contributed to all Associational objects last year \$197.01, and this same church has

contributed this year for the same objects \$374.18, a gain of \$177.17. We mention this particular church simply to show that we have not overstated the case as to the value of women as workers and their ability to enthuse a church to do greater and nobler things for the Master.

The Woman's Missionary Society in the Association gave last year \$155.00, they have given this year \$242.95, a gain of \$87.95. With these facts before us we strongly urge our churches to encourage the women to organize a society in every church in the Association.

The Baptist Ministers' Relief Board was organized by order of the State Convention, May 3, 1890. It is located in Durham. The object of the Board is to assist those Baptist preachers in North Carolina who have spent their lives in the ministry and have come to old age without means of support and are not able to work. If these men had labored as faithfully at some kind of business as they did at preaching they would have had ample means of support of their own in their old age. If they had invested the money which they gave to build up the Lord's cause in North Carolina in some paying enterprise, they would have been worth more today than some of us who are able to give to them. But what would have been the condition of the Lord's cause in the state today? They felt the need, saw the opportunity, realized the responsibility, and gave themselves with what they had, and the Lord is now blessing us as the result of their labors and sacrifices.

Only small amounts are given to each beneficiary, just enough to supply actual necessity. The Board has never asked for large contributions but has endeavored to get EVERY CHURCH to give something to this object. We hope that a wealthy person will soon build and endow a home for such of these saints of God as have no place to lay their heads, no place of their own. But for the present we can only help to supply their needs where they are. We appeal to every church in this Association to give something.

Boiling Springs School

J. H. Quinn read the annual report of the Trustees of the Boiling Springs School:

The Board of Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School is pleased to report the completion of the splendid school building in the early part of the summer. The building has been accepted and the contractor discharged. We congratulate the membership of Kings Mountain and the Sandy Run Associations upon having a high school building in their midst that is equalled by few, if any, and surpassed, as we believe, by none in this State, whether considered from its architectural design or its interior arrangements.

As announced in our last annual report, the purpose of the Board, as stated to the architect, was to erect a \$10,000 building, but the plan submitted by the architect and the unexpected advances in the prices of labor and material caused a much larger outlay than was anticipated originally. The total cost of the building, including material and labor aggregated \$24,532.73. The total cost of the furniture and equipment for for the building to date aggregates \$1612.95. Various churches, Sunday schools and individuals have, to date, furnished 15 rooms at a cost of \$437.50, which is included in the last named amount. In addition to the main building, the Board has made certain necessary additions and improvements to the old church building which stands on the school grounds, which adds additional room for 20 boys, at an outlay of \$161.24.

The grand total of all outlays to date, since the beginning of the enterprise, is \$26,306.92, which includes \$10,000 borrowed by the Board on their personal notes. The total collections to date, from all sources, amount to \$7,866.50. The total of unpaid subscriptions to date, a part of which is in the form of notes, is \$9,001.30. A part of these subscriptions are past due, while others will not be due for some months to come. The total indebtedness to date is \$17,323.24. There is a deficiency in subscriptions to meet this indebtedness of \$8,322.94.

In October, 1907, the Board secured the services of Rev.

Balus Cade as financial agent. He entered upon the discharge of his duties on Nov. 9th. and continued in the work until the 9th of July, when it was thought best to suspend the canvass for two months, owing to the stringency in money matters. He resumed his work with the session of the Kings Mountain Association. He has secured in notes and subscriptions, to date, \$7,392.00, but has collected only \$235.00. The small amount of collections made by him is due to the general business depression prevailing throughout the period of his services, and for the further reason that his time was mainly given to securing subscriptions.

The Boiling Springs High School opened for students October 1st, 1907, in temporary quarters, under the able management of Prof. J. D. Huggins as principal, with a corps of assistants consisting of Misses Smith, McGee, Hamrick and Pitts. A small number of rooms in the school building were completed by January 1st, 1908, at which time the school partly moved into the building, while the work of the masons and mechanics was still in progress. Never did a school do better work under more adverse circumstances. The school closed on May 14th, 1908, with a most creditable program. The total enrollment for the first year was 135. Had the school been prepared to accommodate them the attendance would have been much larger. The second year of the school opened Sept. 2nd, 1908, under most favorable prospects, there being enrolled during the first week 131 students. The total enrollment to date for the term is 169, and of this number 140 are boarding students. Prof. J. D. Huggins has been unanimously re-elected as principal with the privilege of selecting his own assistants.

He has selected the following as his assistants for the present term: Prof. F. A. Brown, B. S.; Miss Alma Smith, A. B.; Mrs. Bessie Atkins Huggins, Lady Principal, A. B.; Miss Mary Clarke Pitts, B. M.; Miss Myrtle Louise Dodson, B. M., Rev. Balus Cade, Miss Mildred McLain and Mr. T. N. Faires.

A regular course of study has been arranged, covering a period of six years, the first two years being an intermediate course and the last four years a high school course. For the benefit of those who do not expect to take the full six years' course an English Scientific course has been provided, covering a period of three years, which offers splendid advantages to those who do not intend en-

tering higher institutions. This course is especially adapted to the needs of those preparing to teach in the public schools. Certificates of proficiency will be given to those who complete either of the courses satisfactorily and give evidences of good character. In addition to these courses there is a most excellent school of music in charge of Miss Mary Clarke Pitts, a most proficient teacher; also a commercial department under able instructors. There is also a good primary school run for the convenience of the people of the community.

In addition to arranging for the early discharge of the indebtedness of the school, it is the earnest desire of the Board to arrange at a very early date for additional dormitory room, for a complete system of water works, electric lights and heating plant for the building, as the realise that the best interest of the school, the safety of the building and its occupants and the convenience and comfort of the school imperatively demand these improvements.

With a view to supplying these latter conveniences at an early date the Board of Trustees, at its last meeting, adopted the following resolution:

“Resolved, that the executive committee of this Board be and same is hereby authorized and empowered to make contracts with outside parties for the erection of additional dormitories on the school grounds; for the addition of electric lights, water works and a heating plant for the present and future buildings that may be erected on the school lands. Said parties are to take actual rents charged by this Board, and no more, under such terms as will conserve the best interests of this Board; and provide under contract that this Board, at its option, shall take over said erections in the future at prices to be agreed upon between the parties erecting said improvements and this Board.”

In order that this school might be able to compete successfully in the future with other schools of its grade throughout the state, it is important that steps be taken to raise an endowment for same.

At the last session of the Sandy Run Association a resolution was unanimously adopted by that body looking to a division of the indebtedness of the school equitably between the two associations, and a corresponding division of its prorata part among the churches of that association. Your Board is unanimously of the opinion that this is a wise course to pursue, and that an equitable division of this indebtedness would meet the approval of the membership

of the two associations. By a division on a basis of membership at last association the distributive share of the King's Mountain Association would be \$9,773.73, and of the Sandy Run Association \$7,549 51. We earnestly request that the two associations take definite action at once to arrange for the liquidation of the present indebtedness of the school.

It becomes the duty of the King's Mountain Association, at its session of 1908, to fill the following vacancies in the Board of Trustees made by limitation of term of all of class "One" to-wit: W. W. Washburn, J. D. Putnam, J. M. Wilson, Rev. J. V. Devenny, and Rev. J. J. Beach. The terms of all members of the Board from the Sandy Run Association expire with each annual session of said Association; hence there will be ten members to elect by said Association at its session in 1908.

Education

Dr. J. Q. Adams read the Report on Education.

Never in our history have the educational forces been more on the alert, and more inspired with a desire to advance the educational interests than now. The whole social circle seems to be affected more or less by the same progressive and investigative spirit. Political, social, and religious problems are being viewed in the light that education is the best means of solving them for the preservation of self and for the general welfare of the human family.

According to Emmanuel Kant, the great secret of human perfection lies concealed in education. Is this not a delightful thought, that education may be presented in a form suited to our children and develop their natures into something higher and better, which may be pictured a future happy life?

It was the thought of enobling the human race that inspired Plato to say, "There is nothing more divine than education." Without this feeling of inspiration, without some lofty purpose, we can never persuade ourselves to endure the constant sacrifice required to develop the true inner lives of our children.

Baptists have done much to raise the intellectual standard of their children, but with all they have done there are

yet tendencies which are constantly appearing that seem to endanger the society of our own ranks. Hence it obviously becomes one of the deepest and most impressive problems for Baptists to solve.

Any Baptist who pretends to stand in the midst of social life ought to see the importance of educational training, and should ask himself whether he is doing anything which will stamp his own children or those of his neighbor that will make them trustworthy reformers, good thinkers, and leaders.

CLASSIFICATION:—We have heard of a state system and a church system of pedagogy, but now there is but little variance with the two systems.

Schools may be classed as follows: The family school, the common school, the high school and the college.

Of these the home school is of the most importance. It is here that the right to mould the minds of the children according to the parent's views cannot be disputed. It is in the home that the idea of unity and relationship is strongest, because of a sense of common parentage. Some kind of discipline must follow from the parents, being the centre from which all activities proceed, and by whose authority the entire family is permeated and governed.

The common schools are made up of family schools and should be influenced and conducted in the same way. The high schools and colleges are composed of the same pupils and carry these influences with them.

So a faithful devotion to the parents calls for faithful devotion to the teachers and professors of all schools—and to God who controls all things. Herbart said, "To the child the family school should be the symbol of all other schools, and from his parents he should derive by idealization the characteristics of the deity. These are the methods by which Baptists should seek to accomplish the culture of their children. The parent who seeks to guide properly the activities of his own children looks well to the common school, and he that does so is of more importance than the college trustee.

All educators and statesmen place the greatest value upon the education of the masses. All National and State progress and higher culture depend upon the fundamental education of the public schools. We have in Rutherford county 78 public schools, to which Baptists should not con-

sider it unworthy of their energies to devote much time to their elevation.

All schools require a regulating power. In our Boiling Springs High School the Baptists of two Associations are behind it, but the regulating power is the trustees, to whom all should come to their rescue. Every Baptist ought to feel proud of the opportunity of sharing in this great and benevolent institution. It is not right that a few individuals should bear the burden of this work, in the support of which all are equally interested. Neither is it creditable to the two Associations to allow an institution founded by them to fail or even want in any particular. During the past year it has enjoyed a reasonable measure of success. For this year I am told that the patronage will be much larger, but refuse to advertise for want of room. This ought not to be. The good already accomplished affords every Baptist within the bounds of the two Associations good reasons for thankfulness to God for having given this Association the opportunity of being His agent in such a noble work; and it places us under obligations to give it our liberal support.

I take the liberty to call the attention of the Association to the following schools: Rutherfordton—Prof. J. B. Bridges, Principal, Forest City—Prof. E. J. Abernathy, Principal, Caroleen—Prof. Beene, Principal, Cliffside—Prof. J. W. Griffen, Principal, and last not least The Henrietta Public High School—Prof. Odus L. Moore, Principal.

In conclusion, for the higher education of young men and women, we of course recommend Wake Forest College and the Woman's University at Raleigh, N. C. These schools should be kept before the minds of our denomination as worthy of their prayers and patronage.

The enrollment at Wake Forest is now 360, which is in advance of any Fall Session. There are 70 applicants for degrees. There are 16 independent departments of instruction—two latest are law and medicine. There are sixty young ministers under the Board, with twenty others at the Theological Seminary. Baptists should be proud of our colleges. They were never more worthy of our loyalty and support.

It has for its object, first, the supplying, as far as possible, all destitute fields with faithful ministers of the gospel; second, building up the Christian by encouraging the study of the Bible and by the distribution of religious literature in the homes and the churches; and third, the stimulating and encouraging of every department of our work by the sympathy which an intelligent and an enlightened constituency assures. But above all and through all runs the one comprehensive purpose of State Mission work, namely, the saving of souls. To lose sight of this is to lose sight of the main motive power impelling to action the fathers of 1830. As we observe the policies of our Board today, we are pleased to record that they have not lost sight of this all-comprehending purpose.

What has been done to give the gospel to dying men, to build up christian character, and to encourage the faint hearted, can never be known here. Only eternity can reveal it. But still we can see that the God-given spirit which called the men of 1830 to the work of State Missions has borne rich fruitage.

When we take into account the fact that almost all the strongest and best churches along the railroads running through the state are, in large measure, the outcome of State Mission work; when we remember that the messenger of the cross, sustained by our board of missions, has pressed his way into fields of destitution far from the centers of activity; and when we consider the fact that State Missions have been, is, and must ever be the base of supply of all our denominational life,—we confess that we do not know how to emphasize the place and importance of State Missions in a sufficient way.

But much as has been done, much remains to be done. From every section of the State comes the Macedonia cry. So long as Eastern Carolina has twenty counties and a population of two hundred thousand whites, and only one twenty-fifth of them in Baptist Churches, and only one Baptist Church to every eighty square miles, there is need for the State Missionary. So long as Peidmont Carolina is the arena of a growing manufacturing activity, where

towns spring up as if by magic, gathing to themselves a heterogeneous population there is work for the State Mission Board. And so long as Western Carolina exists with her natural resources, vastly great and largely undeveloped, and her seventy thousand Baptists themselves as latent as her natural resources, State Missions must not relax its work for God and man.

We sometimes speak of the needs of the hour. Our needs are varied as the work. We need money. We need more men, strong men and supported men. But it seems to the writer of this report that the supreme need is an informed church membership. A constituency familiar with the destitution and inclining the ear to the cry for help. A sympathizing heart and a helping hand are the twin children of an informed mind.

The Bible, the Biblical Recorder, the minutes of the State Convention, and tracts published by the Board are the mediums of information and should be in the hands of all our people. The pastors and active laymen have a great work to do just here.

The Holy Spirit will guide and give the results. Brethren, let State Missions be the watchword for the Sandy Run Association.

Orphanage

Rev. H. D. Harrill read the report on Orphanage:

Twenty-three years ago the Lord laid upon the great heart of Brother J. H. Mills the necessity of a Baptist Orphanage. He conferred with other Brethren who agreed with him and very soon there was an Orphanage Association organized, with the name of John C. Scarboro as President and B. R. Overley and W. B. Clement, Vice-presidents; G. W. Green, Sec., and C. Durham, Treas., which resulted in the erecting of the Baptist Orphanage now at Thomasville, but with very limited means. But as it was made known to the people of North Carolina, and (especially the Baptists,) a great many of them endorsed the movement and it became one of the objects of the Baptist State Convention. Since that time it has been fostered by the denomination and has grown in interest among the people, and the facilities to take care of children have been increased until now there are three hundred and eighty-five children in the Orphanage—more than ever before. It

is estimated that it costs about seventy-five dollars to take care of a child one year, but now, since a great many supplies have gone up and can't see much prospect of them coming down, we shall need enlarged contributions during the next year or we may fall far behind. The last year's expenses were about \$30,000; we expect they will be more next year, and we are behind about \$5,000 at present. So you see at once the necessity of increased contributions. We would recommend that the churches adopt monthly contribution to the Orphanage and that we make a special effort for a liberal Thanksgiving offering this year.

Foreign Missions

J. M. Goode reads the report on Foreign Missions:

The Missionary spirit and work are the Lord's own means of propagating and perpetuating the higher and better life in the world.

The work of Foreign Missions is required to exactly obey our Lord's last great command: "Go ye into all the

world and preach the gospel to every creature;" the emphatic terms of this command bind us to carry the gospel to earth's remotest bound, to the last and least creature of the human race. What every Christian needs is to suffer for some one else. What every unsaved person needs is some one to suffer for him. We suffer for others by sacrificing, by giving or by working for the Lord in their behalf. Much of this has been done through Foreign Missions, and the Lord only knows the amount of good accomplished.

In the last decade the number of our Missionaries in the Foreign field has grown from 76 to 2221, who are supported by the contributions of our southern people which have been increased from \$124,249.69 in 1898 to \$402,228.16 in 1908. The result of the work in 1898 was 701 baptisms, and the result of the work in 1908 was 2,174 baptisms. We are glad to see progress in our own Association. In 1906 contributions were reported for Foreign Mission to the amount of \$247.19; in 1907, \$327.75, and still there is large room for advancement. Quite a number of our churches do but very little for Foreign Missions and by the neglect deprive themselves of the blessedness of abounding in this grace. In our State, out of the number of 1850 churches, 567 do not contribute anything for Foreign Missions. Oh, how we would love to initiate them into the blessed privilege of suffering for others. God help us to so love his cause that we are willing to suffer by sacrificing, giving and working for his creatures.

(1) That all of our Churches put more life, energy and consecration into this imperative teaching work coming to us.

(2) That every Sunday School be kept open, if possible, every Sunday in the year.

(3) That special effort be made by Pastors, Superintendents and other workers, to enlist in the Sunday Schools the adult members of our Churches as well as an increasing attendance on the part of the children.

(4) That we encourage the organization of branch and Mission Sunday Schools until a School will be in reach of every man, woman and child in our Association.

(5) That each School send full reports to the Association, so that the Sunday School table may contain complete statistics.

(6) That the Schools provide themselves with Baptist Literature, ordering the same through our book store at Raleigh, N. C.

(7) That we arrange with our State Sunday School Secretary, to hold within our territory during the coming year, one or more Sunday School Institutes, with a view to training our Officers and Teachers, and improving our Sunday School conditions.

(8) That we have a Sunday School Convention in the different sections of our Association on each fifth Sunday, in the interest of Sunday School work.

(9) That we heartily endorse the Sunday School department of the Baptist State Convention, and we recognize Sunday School Missions as one of our regular benevolent objects, and that we pledge ourselves to contribute of our means to its support. To our knowledge some of the most prosperous Churches are the direct out-growth of Sunday School. This being the fact we should be encouraged to greater activity in Sunday School work. From the natural order of things we are obliged to concede that the future hope of our Church and State, rests on the boys and girls of today. How careful then we should be to give them the proper training while they are young, fixing in their minds the truths and principles of the blessed Gospel of our Saviour.

We, the united Baptist Churches of Jesus Christ, located in Cleveland and Rutherford counties, in the State of North Carolina, having all been immersed upon a profession of our faith in Christ, and having obtained letters of dismission from the Kings Mountain and Green River Associations, propose to maintain the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan:

ARTICLE 1st. This Association shall be known by the name of the Sandy Run Baptist Association.

2nd. This Association shall be composed of such members as shall be chosen and recommended by the churches in union.

3rd. Other churches may become members of this Association by their delegates presenting certificates of their appointment, provided, on examination they may be found orthodox.

4th. The Association shall organize by electing, by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall hold their appointments one associational year, and until their successors are elected, unless displaced by the Body.

5th. This Association, as an act of Christian courtesy, may invite ministers of our denomination to seats with us in council.

6th. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum which the Body is authorized to form for itself.

7th. This Association hath an inalienable right to judge what churches shall be admitted into its confederacy.

8th. The Association thus formed, shall be regarded by us, only in the light of an advisory council, with no coercive power to "Lord it over God's heritage."

9th. This Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in its connection that shall hold corrupt doctrines or indulge in sinful or vicious practices.

10th. Every church in union, having a membership not exceeding fifty in number, shall be entitled to a repre-

sentation of two delegates, and one additional delegate for every increase of fifty over that number. All ordained ministers of this Association are delegates ex-officio.

11th. The primary object of this Association shall be to strive for the unity of the spirit in the bonds of peace among the churches, the employment of missionaries, and to keep up the statistical accounts of the churches in its connection, and, finally, to concentrate our efforts for the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth, and for the deposition of the works of darkness.

12th. None but the members of this body shall be allowed to vote in its councils, and a majority shall decide in disposing of and settling all business that may constitutionally come before them.

13th. This Association in all cases disclaims the right, in its associate capacity, to settle church difficulties, but when a division occurs and two parties equally claim to be the church and represent themselves by letter and delegate, this Association shall have the right to decide, at the first or some future meeting of its body thereafter, which party, if either, shall be recognized as the constitutional church and entitled to a seat in council.

14th. The minutes of the Association shall be read each day and corrected, if need be, by the Body, and when the business shall have been completed, assigned by the Moderator, and Clerk before the Association rises.

15th. Any Article of this Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting, by a majority of two-thirds of the delegates present voting for the same.

HOW TO USE THIS SERIES

THIS beautiful new series of pins, with its harmony of gold and colors, has a most appropriate design of sheaf and sickle. It is suggestive of the text, "Ripe for the harvest." The fields are as ripe for young reapers as for old. The smallest scholar can bring them. We suggest that this series be used for the younger grades of the school. In using this series start order enough of No. 0 for each scholar in the winners', primary, and junior grades; in this way rolling them in the band of "young reapers." Following this, No. 1 is to be given to be worn in place of No. 0 when the child has brought one new scholar to the school.

This plan can be varied by giving No. 2 for two, three, four, or any number of new scholars, and the following numbers accordingly.

This idea is purely suggestive. Start the series with Nos. 0 and 1 and note the result; then you can decide as to the best method to adopt. Increase your attendance and collections fifty to one hundred per cent. by using this series.

HOW TO USE THIS SERIES

The wreath of gold forming the edge of the pin encircles a background in color, on which is emblazoned a Greek cross, also in color, bearing its surface an enameled shield. MINUTES

The Sandy Run Baptist Association convened in her Twentieth Annual Session with the Boiling Springs Baptist Church this, the twenty-third day of September, 1909.

The King's Mountain Association convened at the same hour in the Boiling Springs School Auditorium.

MORNING SESSION

Introductory sermon by Rev. J. M. Hamrick. Text, John, chapter 3, verse 21.

The Association was called to order by the former Moderator, Rev. J. M. Hamrick.

A resolution from the Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School was read.

On motion the Moderator appointed Z. D. Harrill and Dr. J. Q. Adams a committee on order of business to confer with a like committee from the King's Mountain Association.

On motion adjourned one hour and thirty minutes for dinner.

Benediction by Rev. C. W. Payseur.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Called to order by Moderator.

Prayer by Rev. T. J. Moss.

The Moderator appointed J. Q. Adams and C. W. Payseur reading clerks.

The churches called and delegates enrolled, viz :

Bethel—G. B. Pruett, A. H. Hamrick, A. B. Jones, J. T. Wilson.

Bethany—O. Morrow, J. B. Thorn.

Remarks by T. G. Hamrick, J. M. Goods, H. D. Harrill, J. M. Hamrick, N. Scoggins, C. W. Payseur, T. J. Moss and Baylus Cade.

Resolution failed to pass, vote being 44 ayes to 25 nays—not a two-third majority.

Resolution by Dr. J. Q. Adams: That instead of taking pledges at the Association, the executive committee be required to apportion the amounts to be raised for the various objects of the convention among the churches, and that such apportionment be published in the minutes.

Remarks by J. Q. Adams, B. P. Green, C. W. Payseur, L. Johnson.

Resolution fails to pass. Vote 26 to 32.

Z. D. Harrill, of the joint committee on order of business, report that the Sandy Run and King's Mountain Associations will meet in joint session at the stand at 3.30 p. m., to discuss Foreign Missions.

Prayer by Dr. Vann, then adjourned to the stand.

IN JOINT SESSION

Rev. C. T. Tew read the report for the King's Mountain Association and Dr. J. Q. Adams read the Sandy Run report on Foreign Missions.

Report on Foreign Missions

The evangelization of the world is the supreme task of the churches. It is a task assigned us by the Master: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

A great task and, yet, we are not to work at it "single-handed and alone," for "Lo, I am with you alway even unto the end of the world." And neither are we to go in our own strength for "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth; go ye therefore!"

Our obedience to this command is the measure of our love and of our loyalty to the Lord Jesus.

We rejoice to know that all evangelical denominations of Christians are engaged in this work. A mighty host is the army of the Lord doing battle against the common foe!

But other agencies are also at work. God is using the commercial spirit of the age as a channel of gospel dissemination. Man's love of power and conquest, his love of knowledge and discovery; his disposition to mix and mingle, to trade and traffic with others—all these are proving a tremendous factor in the evangelization of the world. The great navies with their Dreadnaughts; wireless telegraphy, flying machines, and polar explorations, mark man's conquest over physical forces and of the earth, and these are but evangels of the gospel of the Son of God! "He makes the wrath of man to praise him and the remainder of wrath he restrains."

The progress of the work as done by Southern Baptists is shown by comparing the figures of ten years ago with the present time: In 1899 we had 82 missionaries, now we have 252; in 1899 we had 845 Baptisms on the foreign field, last year we had 2,905. The income of the Board ten years ago was \$109,267, last year it was \$460,797. In 1899 the Baptists of the South gave 7c. per member to Foreign Missions, last year they gave 22c. per capita. At the same rate of increase, in ten years, we should be giving \$1.00 per member, and more than \$1,000,000 per annum.

We have mission stations in China, Japan, Africa, Italy, Mexico, Brazil and Argentina, with 252 missionaries, 98 ordained natives, 277 native helpers, 259 churches, 162 Sunday schools, with 10,430 scholars, and 16,596 church members, who contributed last year \$40,287. Also 8 theological schools, with 176 students; 13 medical missionaries who treated 42,695 patients last year.

Southern Baptists gave last year to Foreign Missions the sum of \$460,797. Of this amount North Carolina contributed \$35,356.

We desire to commend the work of the Education Secretary of the Board in organizing mission study classes among the churches; 762 such classes have been organized with 9,466 pupils. This movement will meet a long-felt need, and is bound to bear rich fruitage in the coming years, in supplying well informed leaders, and in raising up laborers to go to the front.

Dr. Willingham truthfully says: "Our people love the Lord, but many of them do little because they are not informed."

The key to the situation is with the pastors of the churches. Let them post themselves on the subject of Foreign Missions; let them preach on the subject, and in-

form the people ; push the circulation of the Foreign Mission Journal ; encourage the women in their missionary societies ; organize mission study classes, and above all set the example of liberal giving.

Let us hope that the time is not far distant when the churches that give only \$1.00 to Foreign Missions, or respond to the call for pledges to this object by the old cry of "*same as last year*" shall be heard no more in our associational meetings.

Report Upon Education.

There is a powerful tendency now in force in this country, and indeed, in all other Christian countries toward the entire secularization of education. This tendency gathers force from the utterly false and vicious doctrine, that the child belongs to the State, and must be trained for the State; that the child must be so shaped mentally and socially as to stand for the same things amongst men, that the State stands for. The truth is, the child is not for the State; the State is for the child, and the State must be so shaped as to make it stand for what the Child stands for. The child is the original and unchanging value; the State is the incidental force, and it has no significance at all, apart from its service to the child. Until the public mind shall get itself fully imbued with the distinction herein made, there will emerge amongst us no adequate philosophy of education.

The advocates of this false educational dictum never grow tired of insisting upon it, that education must be made secular in the interests of material progress and industrial and commercial growth. They leave it out of view altogether that the children are not intended primarily to be wealth makers, but to be men; that the purpose and end amongst men is not skill, but character; that the great question about any child—about all children—is not what can he—what can they—do?, but what can he—can they—be made to be? The question is not, what do the shallow educational theorists want the world to have from the children; but the question is, what does the world most need from the children? The State and all the small educational philosophers insist, that the child shall be trained to do, whilst a rapidly diminishing number of persons insist that the child shall be trained so as to BE! To do says one camp; to be says the other camp. And this is exactly the question: Shall the children do in consequence of what they *are*? or shall they *become* in consequence of what they *do*?

Now, if Christianity be, indeed, the original and final religion, that some of us think it to be, it must insist, to the extremity of blood, if need be, that all education must contemplate character making in the children; that doing for the State and for the world at large, must come out of character; and not that character must come out of doing for the State and for the world at large.

That the Sandy Run Association stands for character

making, education for her children is in evidence in the educational institution she is now engaged in building within the shadows of this grove. This institution was projected, has been prosecuted, and does now stand for the ideals in education set out in this report. The progress already made in our school, the young people in its classes, the imperative demand for enlarged means and appliances for the prosecution of its future work, all unite to plead with us to make haste to pay the debt on our property and enlarge our plant so that our ideals in education shall be speedily made into living facts accomplished.

Shall this plea be made to our churches and people in vain?

Brother J. H. Quinn, Chairman Board Trustees Boiling Springs High School, read the following report, viz :

ANNUAL REPORT

Board Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School

To the King's Mountain and the Sandy Run Baptist Associations :

Your Board of Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School hereby submit its fifth annual report since the inauguration of the enterprise, or the second since the opening of the school.

The progress made by your school to date, whether considered from the numbers in attendance or from the character and the quality of the work being done, demonstrates the wisdom of the two associations in establishing in their midst a first-class high school under denominational control.

The total enrollment for the year 1907-8 was 135. The second year closed May 18th, 1909, with a most creditable and interesting commencement program, and showed an enrollment for the year of 219. The attendance at the opening of the present session was larger than at the opening of either of the previous years, and the prospect is that the attendance this year will be far in excess of the other years.

It was thought, at the opening of the present session, to be to the best interest of your school to reserve the

entire dormitory department of the main building for the use of young ladies and the faculty. While this necessitated the placing of the young men largely in rooms at private houses, all continued to board with the clubbing department at the main building. This arrangement is working well. But your Board is fully convinced that arrangements should and must be made at once by which the young men may be afforded rooming facilities on the school grounds. In the face of the heavy debt now hanging over the Board, it cannot, at this time, incur the necessary expense of erecting additional buildings. With a view of meeting this contingency, your Board, more than a year ago, as will be seen from its last report, adopted a resolution in which it proposed to grant the privilege to outside parties to erect buildings on the school grounds to rent to students, members of the faculty, or to families desiring to patronize the school; said parties to retain the title to such buildings and to collect such rental for same, as shall be fixed by this Board, till such time as this Board shall be in position to buy said buildings. We are pleased to note that a contract in line with said resolution has been recently made with a friend of the school by which three neat cottages will probably be erected on the school grounds within the next year, one of the buildings being now under construction. We are glad to announce, further, that other friends of the school are now negotiating with a view of erecting a large brick building for dormitory purposes and on same conditions as above set forth, which building we hope and believe will be erected at no distant day. If these buildings are all erected, the school will then have ample room for some years to come.

Your Board, at its annual meeting in May last, elected Prof. J. D. Huggins and Prof. F. A. Brown as joint principals of the school for a term of two years, believing that a two-year term will subserve the best interest of the school. Your Board does not feel that it is in position to assume the financial responsibility of the teaching force, with the building indebtedness now resting upon the Board. Hence the Principals assume the entire financial responsibility of the school, and employ their own teachers, under the approval of the Board.

The following constitute the faculty for the present term: J. D. Huggins, English and Elocution; F. A. Brown, Mathematics and Science; Rev. Baylus Cade, History and Bible; Mrs. Bessie Atkins Huggins, Ancient

and Modern Languages ; Miss Etta Curtis and Miss Annie Hamrick, Preparatory Department ; Jan Van Wordragan, Director of Music ; T. N. Farris, Commercial Department.

The officers of the school, other than the principals, are : Lady Principal, Miss Etta Curtis ; Chaplain, Rev. Baylus Cade ; Matron, Mrs. M. J. Brown ; Bursar, Mr. E. B. Hamrick.

Board is furnished at actual cost, the average of which, for the two years past, has not exceeded \$5.65 per month.

At the earnest solicitation of the student body, the Board granted to the principals the privilege of adopting a uniform both for boys and girls, as this feature is thought to be both economical and desirable. The uniforms have, accordingly, been adopted.

There are four excellent literary societies connected with the school, viz : two for young men—the Kalagathean and the Athenian—and two for young ladies—the Minnie Ramseur and the Kalliergeonean. These societies, during the past year, have neatly furnished their halls at their own expense. These societies are most valuable factors in the work of the school.

A library and a reading room have been started and all friends of education have here an opportunity of contributing books, papers, and magazines for the use of the student body.

The atmosphere which pervades the school in all of its work is distinctly moral. Two potent agencies in this line are the Y. M. C. A., and Y. W. C. A. These hold weekly meetings and while the membership in these is not compulsory, they are both well attended. All boarding students are required to attend church and Sunday school each Sunday.

Since our last report, a few much needed improvements have been made on the property, viz : The roof of the main building has been painted, more comfortable partitions have been placed in the wood building, additional furniture and school desks have been added, the water supply has been largely increased, and a tank and connections are now being placed, which, it is believed, will furnish sufficient water for domestic purposes and as a protection against fire.

Pursuant to resolutions adopted by the last Baptist State Convention, practically all schools in the State, strictly under Baptist control, have entered into a co-ordi-

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Education is, in its truest meaning, the development and training of all that is good and desirable in the human being, thus qualifying for the

greatest service in life possible. This being true, it is evident that all learning is not education. Education builds character and in the same proportion to our men and women of strong character, will we have a strong state for the people in the state compose the state and not the state the people.

We rejoice in our educational progress. The value of child training is being recognized and we are looking forward to that day, and we believe it not far distant, when North Carolina will no longer remain at the bottom of illiterate states, but will take her stand by the side of all the leading states in education. The Baptists throughout the state and nation are coming into their own along this line. Already our Baptist schools and colleges compare favorably with other institutions of learning, and our Baptist scholars stand in the very front ranks of the world's scholarship. The Sandy Run Association has caught this spirit of advancement as illustrated in the interest taken in our school at Boiling Springs which is second to none of its kind in all the South. There our boys and girls can develop themselves and if never able to attend our institutions of learning, will have received a working knowledge that will make them a power in the community for righteousness and a great help in the advancement of the Kingdom in all its phases.

While we have made great progress yet there is great need for a more thorough and rapid advancement for every age has its perplexing problems to meet and solve. The early days of Christianity were filled with serious problems, but bravely did the pioneers meet them. Through many vicissitudes, they went, groping their way toward a better average of efficiency in both church and state. That day has come and along with it the most complex and perplexing problems. There is the mill problem, the town and city problem, and the great immigration question, each demanding, for a proper solution, men and women of character who are educated not only in heart but in mind. We need an educated ministry and laymen, and, if the cause of Christ progresses as it should, and our government protected from the poison of anarchy we must have leaders who are equal to the situation.

Let us rally around our school at Boiling Springs, liberate it, and set it on a running basis that there may be no obstacles in the way of its work of character building, and also, let us be liberal supporters of the Board of Education at Wake Forest College and our Theological Seminary at Louisville that our ministers may be prepared for leadership and our laymen prepared to follow.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your committee on State Missions is glad to report the work in a flourishing condition. The two departments of our State Mission work are being pushed by our Board to the full extent of their means, and even beyond their means. We have 148 Missionaries in the State and they are supplying 350 stations. These are scattered in different sections of the State, and the reports so far show that they are doing excellent work this year. New houses of worship are going up on the mission fields at the rate of twenty a year. In many communities we need

church houses very badly where the people of those communities are not able to build. The women have kindly agreed to allow the money they raise for State Missions (\$5,000.00) to go to a church building fund, which enables us to aid a little, a few of the most needy places in building houses of worship.

State Missions lie at the basis of all our other work. It is the seed corn for all the rest. Every dollar given to State Missions touches all our denominational work at every point. Every mission church that is established adds to our denominational strength, and makes it possible for us to do more for all the objects of our convention.

Brethren, I think I can safely say that if we come out of debt at the convention, we have more money to raise between now and then than we have even raised in that length of time. As now is the time to make collections, let us address ourselves to the task.

ANNUAL REPORT

Board Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School.

To the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Associations:

Your Board of Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School hereby submits its sixth annual report since the beginning of the enterprise and the third since the opening of your school.

If there yet lingers in the mind of any member of either Association any doubt as to the wisdom of having established in our midst a Baptist High School under denominational control, the influence already exerted for good and for the glory of the Master by your school ought forever dispel such doubt. It is unfortunate that all of our churches do not fully appreciate and take advantage of the opportunities here offered their young members for proper training for Christian service.

The third year of your school closed on the 13th day of May, 1910, with a most interesting commencement program, which would have done credit to a higher institution. Certificates were issued to a class of five who constituted the first graduates of the institution. They were as follows: Misses Ollie Moore, Louise Atkins, and Leila Moore, and Messrs

T. N. Farris and T. C. Holland. A diploma was awarded to Mr. T. L. Wilson, who graduated in the business department. The total enrollment for the past year was 172.

During the past summer Prof. J. D. Huggins and F. A. Brown, who were elected last year for a term of two years, as co-principals, tendered their resignations to the Board which were, at a subsequent meeting, accepted.

After careful and prayerful consideration, your Board decided that the purposes and ends aimed at in establishing the school could best be subserved by the Board's taking over or assuming the entire management of the school; that is, to employ, pay and dismiss teachers, and to have general management of all finances of the institution, etc. Your Board was reluctant to assume this great responsibility in the face of the heavy debt on their shoulders, but they have faith in the purpose of the churches of these two associations to stand by them. We are glad to announce that, with the present attendance, the school is self-sustaining and the number is constantly increasing. There are now enrolled 69 girls and 94 boys making a total of 163 students.

Your Board was more than fortunate in securing the services of Rev. J. M. Hamrick as Principal of your School. He has been on the Board from the beginning of the enterprise and thoroughly understands the school, its history and its needs. His thorough qualification, his striking personality, his lovable character, his Christian bearing, and his thorough devotion to the school were so well known and appreciated by his fellow members of the Board that he was pressed into the service, and the excellent attendance to date and the success in every department of the school fully demonstrates the wisdom of the selection.

The Board was fortunate in retaining the services of Prof. J. D. Huggins, who has labored so hard and faithfully from the beginning for the success of the school, as Assistant Principal. They were also fortunate in retaining as Lady Principal Miss Etta Curtis who has always been so very successful as a teacher and in the management of girls. She is in charge of the girls' dormitory. We are pleased to note that Miss Myrtle Louise Dodson, who was one of our most popular teachers in 1908-9, is again with us and in charge of the music department.

Miss Myrtle Louise Dodson, Director of Music.

T. L. Wilson, Commercial Department.

Arrangements have just been completed for adding an Art Department. An assistant in the Music Department will be added as soon as necessary.

The school is to be congratulated on having for its Matron Miss Rosa Kirby who served so efficiently in this capacity and was so popular with the student body during the first year of the school.

Board is furnished at actual cost, on the club plan, the average price during the past being less than \$6.00 per month.

There are four literary societies connected with the school which are doing most effective work, viz: two for young men—the Anthenian and the Kalagathean; and two for young ladies—the Minnie Ramseur and the Kalliergeonean. These societies have fitted up, at their own expense, halls that would be a credit to many of our higher institutions of learning.

Since our last report, a room has been fitted up for a library and reading room. There are now about 600 volumes in the Library. Donations in the form of books are earnestly solicited, as the school desires to avail itself of a proposition of the Federal Government to donate one thousand volumes to the library as soon as the present number of books is increased to 1000 volumes.

Through the efforts of the Civic League of the School, the grounds in front of the main building have been beautified and cement walks placed. Through the efforts of the young ladies of the institution, the two parlors, which are now being used as music rooms, have recently been painted and are now being furnished without expense to the Board.

The atmosphere surrounding the school, in all of its departments, is strictly moral. Two potent factors in this line are the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A. These hold weekly meetings and, while membership in them is not compulsory, they are both well attended. All boarding students are required to attend church and Sunday School each Sunday.

We are pleased to announce that a few friends of the school have recently organized themselves into a joint-stock company and have erected on the school grounds a three-story brick building with 24 rooms as a dormitory for boys. The building is a handsome structure and an ornament to the grounds. It is just completed and every room is occupied. The stockholders will receive the rents for the rooms till such time as the Board is able to buy the building. It is to be hoped that other friends of the institution will join the above stockholders and double the capacity of this building at once. While rooms in the community are always open to students, it is desirable to have them all on the school grounds. There are yet a few vacant rooms in the girls' dormitory which we hope will be occupied at an early date.

In January of the present year, Prof. G. E. Lineberry, Field Secretary for the State Baptist Educational Board, visited and addressed many of the churches of the two associations in the interest of our school,

and, while we have plainly seen the fruits of his labor, better results would have been obtained had his efforts been confined to a smaller territory. We found it difficult to restrict the territory as numerous churches were calling for his assistance.

The Board has arranged plans for placing water works in the main building which we hope to have completed at an early date.

It becomes the duty of the Kings Mountain Association, at its present session, to fill the following vacancies on this Board made by limitation of term of all of class "Three," to-wit: Carme Elam, E. B. Hamrick, N. B. Kendrick, L. S. Hamrick and J. F. Moore. The terms of the following members of the Board from the Sandy Run Association expire by limitation of term: J. J. Edwards, T. M. Holland and J. P. D. Withrow. Bro. R. R. Haynes who was elected by the Sandy Run Association last year declined the position which adds one other vacancy.

Financial Report.

We are pleased to state that there has been a substantial decrease in the indebtedness on your school since our last report, but not so much as your Board had hoped for. The total collections made since our last report aggregate \$4,170.16. From this sum has been expended \$1,331.00 for interest on indebtedness, \$715.36 for actually necessary improvements and for preservation of the property, and \$360.00 for three years insurance on the property, which was reported a year ago as a part of the indebtedness. The total indebtedness reported a year ago was \$16,951. On this has been paid during the year \$2,076.00, leaving yet due approximately \$14,875.00. The greater part of this indebtedness, as stated in our last report, is represented by joint notes signed by members of the Board and not in the corporate name of the School. There is no encumbrance on your school property which is worth fully \$30,000. There is yet due approximately \$7,000 on old subscriptions, but under the plan of distribution of indebtedness among the churches of the associations, these subscriptions, when paid, are to be placed to the credit of the respective churches to which the subscribers belong, and count as a part of the apportionment of said churches. At the joint session of the two associations last year, practically all the churches agreed to assume the payment of the amount of the indebtedness apportioned to them respectively. The following churches have paid in full their apportionment of the indebtedness: Zoar, First Baptist Church of Shelby and Green's Creek.

Will not other churches speedily follow their example? While the churches under the original plan of apportionment have one year yet in which to pay their said apportionments, yet this rapid accumulation of interest, which so greatly adds to the burden of your Board, ought to

cease. Delay only adds weight to the burden. Unshackle your school that it may the better perform its God-given mission.

Your sons and daughters are urged to take advantage of the opportunity here offered. To the pastors and the churches that have so faithfully stood by your school the Board expresses its deepest appreciation.

In conclusion, will you not pray that our Heavenly Father put it into the hearts of many of the good men and women of these two associations to erect lasting monuments to their memories by providing by gift, will, or otherwise, for the erection of additional buildings on our school grounds, for the better equipment of those we now have, or for the endowing of the institution, that it may the better perform its great mission?

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

When the first mention was made of a Baptist Orphanage for North Carolina, many good people frowned, but now all or nearly all are pleased, because the orphanage has proved a success, we are glad the day has come when a large per cent of our people contribute to this institution, almost all of our people are proud of the Thomasville Orphanage. By looking at the financial table in last years minutes, we find that all but three churches gave something to the orphanage. We hope there will not be a church in the Association but what will give to this object this year.

A number of Sunday Schools take monthly collections, and we hope

that all will adopt this plan, some of our churches remember the orphans at Thanksgiving Day and take a collection, if all the churches would hold service and take collection, many would give that do not.

This institution has cared for more than a thousand orphan children, and is caring for about four hundred today.

The starting of this orphanage has been the cause of many more being started, not only the different denominations, but the secret orders are beginning to build orphanages so that all the orphan children will be cared for.

Everybody thinks of children at Christmas.

We the Sandy Run Association, realizing that some better financial system should be adopted, recommend to the churches the following:—

Resolved 1st. We suggest that the pastors and such laymen as are willing to volunteer their services, visit any church that may invite them, at some time that may be convenient for the church, and present the mission work of the denomination, and we urge the churches to arrange for such meetings.

Resolved 2nd. We suggest that each church appoint a committee, whose duty it shall be to secure a pledge from every member, the same to be paid in monthly installments.

Resolved 3rd. We recommend the appointment of a general committee on benevolence, or a special committee for each object to which committee, or committees shall be assigned the task of collecting these pledges or such parts of them as remain unpaid at the expiration of the time given to each object.

Rev. H. D. Harrill read the following

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

As this is an age of advancement in most all worldly pursuits it should be an age of advancement in Religion and Religious work. Therefore as reading is one great source of information we should be diligent readers and we all need to know more about God. We should be daily

readers of the Bible that we may be able to teach others.

Then as we should know what our people (Baptists) are doing in the State, let us be sure to read the Biblical Recorder for the Recorder is our bond of unity as well as our leader in the work of the denomination, it would be worth a great deal to us as a paper if every family would take it and read it. Next is Charity and Children our orphanage paper. We should read it to keep ourselves informed as to our orphanage work. We should know of the work of the Southern Baptist Convention, then let us read the Home Field to keep ourselves posted. Let us also read the Foreign Mission Journal for it is important that we all know what we are doing in foreign countries for the salvation of the heathen.

We would further recommend that we study the works prepared by our people on Missions and the work of our Missionaries.

C. W. Payseur read the following

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board is to the South what a reservoir is to a

large city. When all other supplies and resources have been exhausted the Home Board comes in to tide them over any weak or dangerous place. The Home Board is like the beautiful Charity of which our Lord speaks, "Charity suffereth long and is kind * * is not puffed up * rejoiceth in the truth * * Charity never faileth." To aid in strengthening the weak places, to more firmly plant the truth at strategic points, and prepare material for the other fields of the Master's Work, has been the function of the Home Mission Board.

Out of 90,000,000 population, there are 20,000,000 members of some evangelical denomination. Of the remaining 70,000,000 about 12,000,000 belong to other religious sects. This leaves 58,000,000 without any religious affiliation at all. Almost two thirds of the American population is not properly religious. We see in Home Missions the greatest patriotism and highest Christian service, going hand in hand.

About one-third of the area of the United States and about one-third of the population, are in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Baptists of the South have in their churches nearly one half of the evangelical membership in their territory.

Cuba was freed largely through agencies put in force by the growth and influence of the Mission Cause under our Home Board. Naturally this field would claim our future interest and support. Last year our membership in Cuba was increased by baptism 22 per cent and fine new churches were organized.

The work in the Canal Zone is exceedingly interesting. The net increase by baptism last year was 31 per cent and the average contribution per member was \$7.15—almost twice as much as the average contribution per member in the churches of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Red Man welcomes Baptists as he does no other denomination and work prospered there last year as never before.

The Negroes are prevailingly Baptists. Therefore, Baptists can influence them as no other denomination and the responsibility is largely ours. Our board is co-operating with the National (Negro) Home Mission Board and their plan is proving to be both successful and economical.

There are 4,500 houseless churches in the South and the Board is trying to secure a church building fund of \$500,000 so they can help the weak churches build houses of worship.

For many years Foreigners have been coming to our country at the rate of one hundred thousand per month. Many of them cannot read or write, but they come without any conception of our customs, laws, or religion; come without self-respect, respect for our country, laws or religion. They come filled with ignorance, superstition, vice and shame. Soon they are to hold the balance in politics, then they will be consider-

ed and their low selfish ideas will be injected into the plans and shaping of our great country. In their present condition they can not attain to our thinking, planing and living. So you see the tremendous task the Home Mission Board has to bring the millions of foreigners into the atmosphere and realm we now live.

The Board is helping 25 mountain schools to educate, christianize and indoctrinate the thousands of bright boys and girls in the highlands. We have about 5,000 students in these 25 schools, and about 100 of them will go out as active messengers for the Most High King.

The evangelistic forces working under the Board is doing untold good. Their sound, sane plans are being observed in many of our churches by many of our pastors.

The Board along all lines have had an unusually prosperous year. The receipts last year for Home Missions was \$329,475, an increase of 16% over the previous year. Last year the Board was able to report by the missionaries 27,325 baptisms.

Your committee would recommend that every Baptist see to it that he has access to the Home Field and read it—only 25 cents in clubs of ten. We further recommend that we increase our contributions to Home Missions. We can easily do it if some good Brother or Sister will in every church make it a point to canvass the membership of their church and try and secure a contribution for Home Missions from each member—try it Brother, and let us go forward.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Christ said, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature."—Mark 16:15. And again He says, "And ye shall be witnesses unto Me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria and unto the uttermost parts of the earth."—Acts 1:8.

Jesus was speaking to His disciples this great command to go preach and witness unto Him. This command is just as binding on His people to-day as it was on His disciples at that time.

From the reports of our missionaries in the Foreign Fields the work is encouraging. The Board has sent out 32 new missionaries during the year and 8 missionaries of the Bible Mission Society in South China have united with the work of the Board. We have now 246 missionaries and 467 native helpers. They report 3,223 baptisms last year. We have 289 churches with 539 out stations with a membership of 19,239. We have 207 houses of worship and 318 Sunday Schools with 11,156 scholars.

There are 142 day schools with 3,771 pupils. There are 8 woman training schools with 179 students and 8 theological training schools with 200 students. What a power these trained men and women can be in the work.

The total receipts for the year were \$501,058. With joy we pass the half million mark. The amount asked for this year by the Convention is \$600,000. The Board's disbursements for the year are \$447,335, 88 per cent of receipts.

Expenses in Richmond \$31,294, 6 per cent of receipts. Expenses in States \$17,863, 3½ per cent of receipts. For interest \$10,281, 2½ per cent of receipts making in all 12 per cent on all receipts. May God help every Christian to see the great need of Foreign Missions and come to its support.

REPORT ON WOMAN'S MISSIONS.

The Woman's Work during the past year has been most encouraging—a larger number of women and young ladies entering than ever before. This is the seventh anniversary of their work in this association. Through their influence, no doubt, many souls have been brought to Christ. The work is yet in its infancy with a bright prospect, but we believe there is a great reward laid up in Heaven and many stars will be added to the crowns of those who are so earnestly engaged in this noble work. We should encourage this movement, because the Lord is in the work.

We learn from reports that the work is increasing in this association, in the State and also in the Southern States. Their contributions last year in the State was \$12,118.90, in the Southern States \$123,216.16 and there has been a substantial increase in the contributions in our own association. Amounting to \$747.09. Increase over last year \$232.15.

The Woman's Missionary Society is one of the most important organizations of the church work, as the women are more zealous and accomplish so much more than the men. It is time that they be given fuller recognition in the associations. We therefore recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved 1st. That woman's work be given a place on the program for the second day at future meetings of the association and the women be urged to make a report of their work.

Resolved 2nd. That all pastors in the association be requested to

bring the matter of organizing the women to the notice of their churches at their regular monthly meetings.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

Nineteen years ago the Relief Board was established, and the churches were asked to make this one of the objects to which they contribute. According to the plan adopted by the Convention, two-thirds of the amount contributed each year goes into the current fund, and is appropriated to worn out and needy preachers, while one-third is invested, and the interest used for current expenses. This permanent fund has been augmented by a few small bequests. There is now an invested fund of about fifteen thousand dollars. There are between fifty and sixty beneficiaries of this Board. Most of these are preachers, and a few are the widows of preachers who have been left in destitute circumstances. The appropriations made to these worthy brethren range from fifteen to a hundred and five dollars a year. This is a mere pittance, but is the best the Board can do with its limited resources. We should greatly increase our contributions to this worthy object.

Up to this time the churches have contributed to Ministerial Relief this year \$3,063.59. This is a little ahead of the receipts up to this time last year, but the needs are greater than ever before. We suggest that every church take a collection for this object on the Sunday on which they hold services nearest Christmas day.

J. R. Matheny read the following

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Our people need to keep up with all our denominational activities. The Sunday School is one of the most important. We have been actively engaged in it for more than a hundred years, but our greatest progress has been in the last twenty years. According to the Convention reports 1905 to 1909, the number of Sunday Schools has increased from 1290 to 1681—a gain of 31%. During this year, our State Secretary has been actively engaged in organizing new Schools and getting information about Schools already running but not reported to any association. He can now give the names of 154 new and unreported Schools. This will make a total of 1835 Schools in the State. The enrollment has increased 48,930 or 47% in the four years named. This does not include the gains this year.

Many more Schools are staying open through the whole year. Statistics show a gain of 81% at this point since 1905.

The Sunday School Mission Work became self supporting last year for the first time in its history.

The most marked progress in Sunday School activities is in contributions to the different objects of the Convention. The Sunday Schools last year, gave nearly \$30,000. The contributions have more than doubled during the last five years.

There has been great progress in the Sandy Run Association during the last few years. Our churches all have Schools, and there are several branch schools in our bounds. Quite a number of them are open twelve months in the year, and we learn that others expect to remain open through the winter this year. The average attendance in our Schools is not what we would like for it to be, but we note with gladness, that we have three Schools in this Association, that reported last year a larger enrollment than their church membership, viz: Cliffside, Caroleen and Henrietta. We would recommend Home Department Work to arouse interest and enlarge enrollment in the Sunday School.

It is sad that only a little over half of our church members are in the Sunday School. It is said that about 65,000 children come to the years of accountability every year. We should strive to be more active in the

Sunday School work in the future than we have been in the past.

In our opinion one of the greatest hindrances to Sunday School work, is the lack of trained teachers and recommend that all teachers take the teachers Training Course, which costs nothing except for books or else get some of the very best helps in connection with the quarterlies. The interest seems to be deepening and widening all the while and we hope and trust that the time will come when all our Churches will keep their Schools open all the year and that all our members, or nearly so, will become interested in the work.

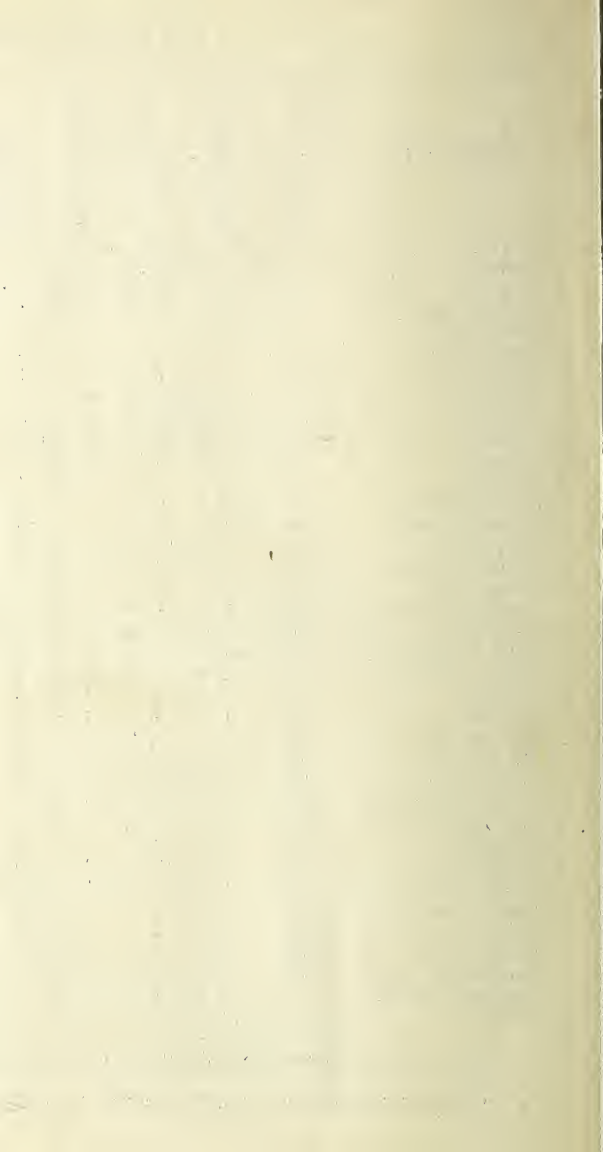

By motion, the Board of Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School with the ministers of both associations meet tomorrow at 9 a m here in the school building to confer on business matters pertaining to the Associational High School.

The moderator announced the following committee on religious

Brother Goode as chairman of the committee, immediately read the following report on the subject:

“The literature of a nation moulds the thoughts of the people of that nation, guides their actions and impresses its mark indelibly upon the lives and conduct of its citizens. Literature is the soul of action, the only sensible articulate voice of the accomplished facts of the past. You may judge a man more truly by the books and papers which he reads than by the company which he keeps, for his associates, are in a measure imposed upon him, but his reading is that of his own choice. If then, our thoughts are moulded, and our action guided, and our lives and conduct indelibly marked by the literature we read, how careful we ought to be to read pure religious literature in order that we may develop a noble Christian character. First, last and all the time read the Bible, then as the organ of the Baptist State Convention the Biblical Recorder should be an important factor in the home of every Baptist.

It has a distinct work which can be supplied by no other publication,

To keep in touch with our orphanage work it is also imperative that each family be supplied with Charity and Children. We can as unreservedly recommend the Home Field and the Foreign Mission Journal to every Baptist in order to keep posted in the missionary work.”

Friday Morning Session.

Moderator called body to order. Prayer by Rev. D. J. Hunt. Rev. W. R. Beach, representing the Biblical Recorder, B. W. Rodgers representing the orphanage and Charity and Children. Rev. D. J. Hunt from Round Hill High School were recognized and welcomed as visitors.

Bro. J. H. Quinn read the report of the Board of Trustees of Boiling Springs High School. The reading of this report was immediately followed by the reading of the report on education by Rev. J. M. Hamrick. The following are the reports as read:

To the King's Mountain and Sandy Run Baptist Associations:

The Board of Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School hereby submits its fourth annual report since the opening of your school in September, 1907.

We are glad to note the rapid growth of interest in our school in every section of the two associations and in many communities beyond our borders. Whatever may have been the previous opinion of our people as to the need of such a school all can now clearly see the great advantage to the Baptist cause and to Christian education in having in our midst a high school under denominational control, which is second to none in the state in the class of work being done and in the influences surrounding the student body.

The fourth year of the school closed on the 13th day of May 1911, with a commencement program which would have done credit to many of our higher institutions. The school sent forth its second graduating class, composed of three young men and two young ladies—Messrs. M. A. Stroup, O. N. Lovelace and O. P. Hamrick and Miss Bettie Lee Cade and Mrs. Dr. C. T. Hamrick (the latter graduating in music only.) Certificates were issued to the graduates. The total enrollment during the last scholastic year was 263, making an increase over the previous year of 96 students which was an increase of about 56 per cent.

As noted in our last annual report, your Board, by way of experiment last year assumed the financial control of your school which had previously been borne by the principal. This experiment proved to be to the best interest of the school, and is, therefore, being continued. The cost of operating a school

of this grade is necessarily great. When all outstanding accounts for last year shall have been collected, the school will have been nearly self sustaining.

During the summer of 1910, Rev. J. M. Hamrick, who had been a most valuable member of our board since the establishment of our school, accepted the principalship, temporarily only. He succeeded so well in this responsible position that your Board did everything in its power to induce him to retain the principalship, but he could not resist the call of the Spirit to return to his pastoral duties. This left us again without a principal.

Many applications and recommendations were placed in the hands of your Board for this position. After many weeks of investigation and prayerful consideration your Board elected Prof. W. J. Francis as principal. He is a native of Haywood County, N. C., a graduate with honors of Wake Forest College, and has had several years experience as principal and superintendent of high and graded school. As is characteristic of the sturdy manhood and vigorous minds of our own mountain section, he knows how, when, and where to work to accomplish the greatest results. He is popular with both students and patrons. Under his wise administration the success of the school is assured.

While Rev. J. M. Hamrick has ceased to be principal, we are glad to announce he is not entirely lost to the school, as he retains the position of teacher in the department of the Bible. We are also fortunate in retaining as assistant principal, Prof. J. D. Huggins who resigned the principalship in 1910. His faithful and efficient services in behalf of the school are recognized wherever the school is known. He teaches mathematics, Science and Elocution.

The school is to be congratulated on retaining the following teachers who have been faithful and loyal to the school: Miss Etta Curtis, lady principal and Mrs. J. D. Huggins, intermediate department; Miss Ezelia Hamrick, latin and history; Miss Gwendolen English, department of English and Mr. T. L. Wilson, Commercial department.

The director of Music is Miss Cornelia H. Barbee, of Durham, N. C., a graduate of the Southern Conservatory of Music, and of seven years experience. She not only comes highly recommended, but she has already proven her efficiency her ability to teach and her enthusiasm in her work. An assistant will be added in this department when needed.

In no respect has the school been more fortunate than in the retention as Matron of Miss Rosa Kirby. In our opinion she has few equals and no superiors in this capacity.

Excellent board on the club plan at actual cost is furnished, the average price in the past being less than \$6.00 per month. We do not believe similar board at this price can be duplicated by any other institution.

This report would be incomplete were we to fail to note the excellent work being done by the four literary societies of the

school—Two for young men, the Athenian and Kalagathen, and two for young ladies, the Ramseur and the Kalliergeonean. They have fitted up at their own expense two halls that are equal to those found in many of our colleges.

Since our last report the library hall has been much improved and beautified and many additional books and periodicals have been added, but donation of books by friends of the institution would be greatly appreciated, as they have an opportunity of securing 1000 vols from the government as soon as a like number shall have been secured elsewhere.

The Civic League of the school has done much toward improving and beautifying the grounds.

Water is conveyed from a large spring by means of a hydraulic ram to a large tank near the main building. A movement is now under way in the community to sink a very deep well to secure water for the school and church.

A small house for use of servants has just been erected on the school grounds.

The \$18,000 insurance now on the main building will expire October 22nd, and the woodwork on the building which is exposed to the weather needs painting at once. We therefore request both Associations to take a collection during the present sessions to meet the cost of re insuring and of doing the painting referred to.

Our school opened this year on the 15th day of August, two weeks earlier than usual. Only one week will be allowed for Christmas holidays. Hence the school will close three weeks earlier than usual next spring, that is April 23—25th. These changes were made for the convenience of the young men from the farm.

The total enrollment for the present session to date is 171 this is 8 more than the enrollment at this date last year, and is very encouraging when we consider the age of the school, the unfavorable conditions of crops and the fact that we have so recently made a change in the principalship. While the number of girls in attendance is not so large as last year, the number of boys is much larger.

The young ladies and all members of the faculty, except the principal room in the main building, while the young men occupy the other three buildings on the grounds and room in private homes.

We desire to call special attention to the moral atmosphere which at all times surrounds the school, and the Christian spirit which prevails among the student body, and the better fits them for efficient service in their home, churches and Sunday Schools. Potent factors in this line are the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A. Membership in these is not compulsory, but both are well attended. All students are required to attend church and Sunday School each Sunday. For other protection of the school the village was recently incorporated as a town.

The terms of the following members of this Board from the Kings Mountain Association expires with this session, said

members being known as Class "One," to-wit: J. D. Putman, W. W. Washburn, E. C. Borders G. F. Hambright and Rev. C. A. Jenkins. Brother J. W. Irvin, who was appointed last year, declined to serve which leaves one other vacancy to be filled. The terms of none of the members from the Sandy Run Association expire this year, but the removal of Rev. C. W. Payseur from the Association leaves one vacancy to be filled at this session.

The Indebtedness

Your Board is pained to report that no reduction has been made in the indebtedness of the school since last report. Interest continues to accumulate at the rate of \$800 to \$900 per year which must be paid before any reduction can be made in the principal. We have already paid about \$4,000 on interest alone. How much longer shall this suicidal procedure continue? Last year we reported the indebtedness to be approximately \$14,875., but we later found that there were some unpaid interest not included in that estimate. The collection since last report aggregated \$810.00. Of this sum all has been applied to interest leaving approximately now due same as last year.

It will be recalled that the third year expires this fall within which the churches of the two Associations were requested to pay the portion of the indebtedness which they were each asked to assume. So far only two churches, Zora and Sandy Plains have paid their apportionment with interest, and only four others—Shelby, Zion, Mt. Pleasant (C) and Green River have paid their apportionment only. Nearly all of the others have paid a part while a few have not been heard from.

With a view of finding some means of liquidating this indebtedness your Board at a recent meeting adopted a resolution embodying the following suggestion:

That each church take immediate steps to pay its distributive share of indebtedness with interest from date of apportionment and that if necessary the deacons and other leading members join in a note in behalf of the church to borrow the money.

All churches through their respective pastors have been requested to authorize their pastors and delegates to the two associations this year to act for and in behalf of their respective churches on such matters as may come before the association on this subject. It is earnestly hoped that such power has been given by each church and that we shall settle this matter this year once for all. Your Board is suffering under this burden, but your school is suffering more. May God help you to do your duty.

We are pleased to note that our college at Wake Forest has opened with the largest number of students in its history of seventy six years. We commend to young men preparing for college our own Wake Forest.

Meridith College, located at Raleigh, has opened with the largest number of girls since it opened its doors in 1899. No feature of our denominational work is destined to do more for the evangelization of the world and the propagation of our faith. We further commend Chowan College at Murfreesboro and especially do we commend to the hearts of our own association our own high school at Boiling Springs. Our school has had the best opening in its history and the outlook for the year is excellent. We urge our people to send their boys and girls to Boiling Springs.

The responses were very promising and encouraging; the delegates with few exception agreeing to see that the full amounts of their apportionments be paid by Jan, 1st 1912. The reports were then adopted.

The moderator then announced the following committees viz: On Digest of Letters—C. M. Teal, J. M. Goode and A. I. Jolly. On Obituaries, F. M. Freeman, A. D. Brooks and J. L. Hamrick. On Finance, J. F. Long, J. A. Calton, and Stough A. Davis.

Then adjourned for dinner: Benediction by Rev. J. M. Hamrick.

Afternoon Session

Convened at 2:30. Prayer by Rev. G. B. Pruett. Rev. J. M. Hamrick offered the following resolution which was adopted:

“Resolved that the Sandy Run Association hereby authorize the board of trustees of Boiling Springs High School to ask

Rev. A. H. Simms to extend his work of assisting churches in arranging the indebtedness on the school building when his services shall be thought by the board needed in our association."

Report on Sunday Schools

The report on Sunday Schools was read by J. R. Matheney and is as follows:

We, the committee on Sunday Schools, beg leave to report that Sunday School work among Baptists was never more hopeful. Nevertheless, it is far from what it ought to be. But there are many reasons for encouragement, when we consider the work that is being done in North Carolina in the last few years, we have gained over two hundred churches and nearly sixty thousand members. We now have about nineteen hundred Schools in the state. There are about 140 churches that do not report any schools, but we have over 100 branch schools

When we compare our work on this line in N. C. with that of the whole Southern Baptist Convention we have grounds for encouragement. During the last five years there has been a gain of nearly 22 per cent in the number of Baptist Sunday Schools in the South while in North Carolina there has been a gain of over 40 per cent. We have now about 175,000 pupils enrolled. We have made a gain on this point of about 60 per cent

Other hopeful signs are that as they learn more about the Master, they are working more and giving more than ever before; and that teachers and Sunday School workers are realizing the necessity of better preparation for work. We have in this state eighteen hundred Sunday School workers who have taken the Convention Normal Course and many others have enrolled.

We think our state secretary is doing a good work in holding institutes in different parts of the state. Sunday schools can aid him materially by giving to the support of the Sunday School work and by attending said institutes.

The Sunday School work in the Sandy Run Association seems to be progressing. We have a school in every church and several branch schools. A large number of these are perennial schools. There are some that close during the winter and our state secretary urges us to do all we can to keep these open through the winter.

Nearly all additions to the churches are from the Sunday Schools, and as yet there is less than half of our church members enrolled in the Sunday School. These need to be brought in. Who will go after them? There are many unsaved persons who need to be brought into the Sunday Schools. We hope all Sunday School workers will take courage and continue to press the work.

Report on State Missions

The report on State Missions was read by Rev. Z. D. Harrill and is as follows:

The State Mission Board began its work about eighty or eighty one years ago. We could not tell of the work that has been done during these years and yet, there is great need for the enlargement of our gifts to state missions. One reason why our association is so sleepy and drowsy on the State Mission subject is that we have no destitution in our Association and we fail to look at the destitution in other places.

The Lord has greatly blessed us and this should stir us to do more for those that have not been so fortunate. Let us remember that as we enlarge our State Mission work we will be able to do more for Home and Foreign Missions and all objects of the Convention.

We would recommend that every church in the Association make an effort to get every member to give something for State Missions every month.

Report on Home Missions

The report on Home Missions was read by Rev. H. D. Harrill and was as follows:

Last year the Home Mission Board conducted mission work in all the states in the Southern Baptist Convention, including New Mexico, Cuba, and the Canal Zone. The number of missionaries in service was 1302; about 150 of these maintained wholly by the Home Mission Board and the others by the Board in cooperation with other agencies. Besides work among white Americans, mission activities were conducted among the negroes, Indians, Italians, Spaniards, Germans, Swedes, Cubans, and Panamans.

During the year the Home Board Missionaries baptized 26,866, received a total number of 49,297 persons into the churches. It has organized 235 churches, built 289 houses of worship, and held 243 evangelistic meetings.

There are 26 mountain mission schools, having under their instruction 4,410 students. Eight of these are in North Carolina.

There was never before so much need of home missions in the South as now and there have never been richer opportunities than those which now beckon Southern Baptists to redouble their efforts for saving America.

The larger needs have come from the growth of population the growth of industrialism and the consequent changes in our population. The vast increase in material wealth of the South, the recent large movement of people into the Southwest, the increasing rate at which immigrants are coming South is enlarging task of Home Missions. The new and intenser conditions of living urge us to more capable city mission endeavor. These new conditions of living have penetrated the far extending rural districts of the South where five sixths of Southern Baptists live, and the hold of country churches on the rising generation is threatened. The old rural isolation has been largely done away with by rural mail delivery, better roads, telephones better farming machinery, automobiles, etc. These conditions have caused a new and intenser intellectual atmosphere which stimulates our young people. Alas it has not its center as formerly in the churches. It may be that God has allowed this crisis to press upon Baptist efficiency in the country to reprove us for having, as a denomination, so long neglected to develop the converts whom we evangelized. We received the great commission to preach and baptize but did read the last part of which is to develop, cultivate, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you.

Therefore, we, your committee would recommend that all our churches increase their contributions to Home Missions twenty-five per cent next year, that we may be able to claim the promise, "and lo I am with you always even unto the end of the world."

Report on Orphanage

The Thomasville Baptist Orphanage is twenty six years old. More than twelve hundred children have been gathered within its sheltering arms.

The usual number at the Orphanage is from three hundred to three hundred and eighty five. The running expenses amount to about one hundred dollars a day. It costs about eighty five dollars a year to support a child. We commend the plan of taking a collection once a month by the Sunday schools and annual Thanksgiving service and collection for the Orphanage, as the very best means to raise our Orphanage money.

We urge, therefore, that every Sunday School take a collection one Sunday in each month and that each church hold a Thanksgiving service and make a thank offering to our orphanage.

Report on Ministerial Relief

Report of the committee on Ministerial Relief was read by B. P. Green and was as follows:

The Baptist Ministerial Relief Board was established in 1890. The Board is now located at Durham, N. C. where it met for the first time.

It is composed of nine trustees and a number of associate members. These are elected annually by the Baptist State Convention. The trustees have the power to transact the business of the board. The object of this board is to afford aid and relief to needy Baptist ministers of North North Carolina and their widows. There are at present thirty one beneficiaries. These receive from forty to two hundred dollars a year. Some have no means of support except the amount they receive from the board. To entitle a minister or his widow to help from this Board he must be a Baptist minister of North Carolina or have served as pastor or evangelist for five years prior to his application for help.

Reports show that three-fifths of the churches of the state

give nothing for this object. Also one-fourth of the associations do nothing for this work, and some of them have beneficiaries on the board.

Let the Sandy Run Association try to do more for this worthy object.

Rev. C. T. Tew read the following report on Foreign missions.

Foreign Mission Report

Foreign mission work is the unselfish endeavor of God's people to give the whole gospel to the whole heathen world. To evangelize the home land means better homes for our children, better laws and institutions for the protection and instruction of our children. Hence the possibility of selfishness in our home work. But to give ourselves, our sons and daughters and of our means that the heathen may have the gospel, is one of the most unselfish deeds in the history of the world.

Our Foreign Mission Board is engaged in the glorious work of evangelization in China, Africa, Japan, Mexico, Italy, Brazil, and Argentina. From all these fields come encouraging reports and the outlook is very hopeful. The board sent out last year 30 new missionaries and to-day we have on the Foreign field 273 missionaries with 531 native helpers who are training hundreds of others. Reports from these fields show 3618 baptisms last year, seven training schools for women with 140 students and nine theological training schools with 212 students. We have also fifteen medical missionaries who treated last year 40716 patients and opened the way for the planting of the gospel in the hearts of millions of people. We have 297 churches 605 outstations and a membership of 21343.

Our denomination is emphasizing the educational part of our work as is shown in the work of our schools. We do not believe however, as some theologians have taught that civilization must precede Christianity—that you must make the heathen a reasonable being before you can successfully lead him to Christ, but Christian work succeeds and proves permanently effective, the school must go hand in hand with the church. There must be trained leaders for the work of christianizing the heathen world is largely one of teaching. Our schools are doing a great work in planting in the heathen hearts of the young people the great christians doctrine of God, righteousness, sin and salvation by by teaching them science, history and philosophy from the christian point of view, in preparing

them to be true and efficient exponents of spiritual christianity.

Our finances last year amounted to \$510,008 97 which is a small gain over the previous year. Eighty eight per cent of all Foreign Mission contributions is sent to the Foreign field, while the remaining twelve per cent is used for home expenses viz: Interest two and one half per cent, to state boards three and one half per cent, and in Richmond six per cent including the boards share of the expenses of the womans work and the laymens' movement. This year there is a debt of \$89,600 confronting the board. To pay this debt and maintain the work as it now is we must raise this year \$600,000. The Sandy Run Association paid last year to Foreign missions \$607.22, an average per church of a little over sixteen dollars which is far below what we are able to give.

There are opportunities before our denomination to-day as never before. Soul liberty is exerting itself all over the world which has called into operation that great body known as the Baptist World Alliance, the greatest denominational body on the earth. China with its 440,000,000 of people is passing through a marvelous transformation. The only hope for these millions of people is the gospel of the crucified Christ. Will we give it to them? Japan is leading the Orient. Shall we lead Japan to Christ? Africa is being ruined by Mohammedanism. Let us turn back this tide by the power of the gospel. South America, Mexico and Italy are sick and tired of Romanism. They are receptive to the gospel and are now ready to receive it.

We recommend:—First. That our people inform themselves upon our Foreign mission work by reading our mission literature. Second. That each member be given the opportunity and impressed with the obligation to give regularly either weekly or monthly to the mission cause. Third. That all contributions be sent directly to the board immediately after collection and not wait until the pressure comes in March and April.

At this time he knew but little about the Bible. but before he died was well versed in scripture. He was first called at Shiloh, then to other churches. He was an earnest, zealous, consecrated preacher, led by the spirit of God. He did a great work, establishing churches, building houses of worship, etc. Many were led to Christ through his preaching. He was a great revivalist and seemed to be a man after God's own heart. He was loved and respected by all who knew him, but God took him to his eternal home. His life and work will live in the minds of the people for many years.

HOME MISSION REPORT.

The Home Mission Board is leading the Southern Baptist Convention in a worthy way in the great and fundamental work of saving the South. This work is not constituted by the officers of the board only. Every Baptist throughout the South, regardless of circumstances, has a part in this glorious work of saving the lost and training the saved for efficient service in the kingdom of our Lord.

In the last few years great and very gratifying progress has been made among Southern Baptists. The Home Mission conviction has become stronger and stronger until our contributions have marvelously advanced and thousands of souls saved and hundreds of churches constituted. A comparison of the figures of 1902 and 1912 shows a remarkable advance.

Are we Southern Baptists, looking towards the future, purposing to do our full share of the work of Christianizing America? We gave last year approximately one and one-fourth cents per citizen in the Southern Baptist Convention territory, or an average of about fifteen cents per member, to Home Missions.

There are in the South 20,000,000 persons who make no profession of faith; 11,000 of our own churches so untrained that they give nothing to mission work; an industrial prosperity that is making men forget God in the pursuit of wealth; 3,500 Baptist churches, without houses of worship, appealing for aid; millions of backward people of Anglo-Saxon blood whose splendid potentialities for God await for their releasing the touch of Christian missionary schools; ten million blacks more easily approachable and more readily stimulated by Southern Baptists than by any Christian body.

In our Thirty-three mountain schools the Home Board is training 5,000 mountain youths. Seventy-five young ministers a year are trained in these splendid power-houses of the highlands. Is there any wiser, better, more promising work of love in which we may engage than that of maintaining these schools and enlarging their number and reach?

The watchword of the Home Board is forward, and in an enthusiastic meeting last July an aggressive campaign was planned for the present year and two important steps were taken in two ways. The first was in conformity to the instructions of the Southern Baptist Convention that the board immediately take steps to raise a \$1,000,000 Church Building Loan Fund. The board decided to raise this amount in three years and to employ

special workers for this purpose as soon as possible. By the aid of this fund those 3,500 homeless churches can be made strong centers for Christ and His truth by erecting suitable church houses.

The second large step taken was in response to repeated reports of the board to the Convention urging the Home Board to put forth larger efforts to help in training and enlisting backward churches. This note, first sounded by the lamented Dr. F. H. Kerfoot, has become stronger and stronger until now several of the State Boards are appealing to the Home Board for aid in this work. At its meeting in July the board ordered the establishment of a department of enlistment and cooperation, and provided for the election of a special representative to labor in this department of the work.

We believe there will come out of this movement great blessings and opportunities to Southern Baptists for their usefulness far beyond our conception. It is carrying out the great commission, "Teaching them to observe all things."

The committee earnestly commends the work of this board to the prayers and enthusiastic and liberal support of all the churches in our Association.

Realizing the importance and need of this work and the stimulus that information will give to us, we, your committee, recommend that all our pastors and laymen subscribe and read mission literature such as the "Home Field," the "Home Mission Task," etc., all of which can be had from the Home Board, Atlanta, Ga., at a very small cost.

every call of our denomination and fostered every undertaking that has been for the uplift of our people.

Our people owe a great debt of gratitude for the achievements attained largely through its influence.

It is one of the greatest powers for good now in the state, but not so great as it should be on account of the comparatively small patronage. It can never do its best work until it can in some way reach more of our people.

It is estimated that we have seventy-five thousand Baptist families in our State and less than fifteen thousand of these receive the organ of our State Convention. Let us urge its patronage for we are morally obliged to do this, that we may double its circulation this year.

The Moderator announced the Committee on Finance as follows: G. B. Pruett, J. A. Calton, L. P. Jolly.

The report on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. Wade D. Bostic, and, on motion to adopt, remarks were made by W. D. Bostic and J. W. Walker.

Following is the report:

as follows: In Richmond, 5 per cent; W. M. U., 1 per cent; interest, 2 1-2 per cent; State expenses, 3 1-2 per cent. This percentage of expenses is larger than the board wants it to be. Our people can reduce it very much by sending their money all through the year, so as to save the interest account. Let it also be remembered that a large part of the money used at home is expended in efforts to arouse our people and increase contributions.

The work has often been greatly helped by bequests and annuities. More and more our people ought to remember the board in their wills. Pastors can exert a blessed influence in this direction. A still better way is to give money to the board on the annuity plan whereby the donor receives an income from the gift during his life. Write to the board for particulars.

The Southern Baptist Convention asked the churches to raise \$618,000 for Foreign Missions this year. Every dollar of it is needed to meet past obligations and maintain the work on a hopeful basis. The Convention apportioned this amount among the various States, and the amount asked of each State is apportioned among the Associations. It is very important that this Association, either through its Executive Committee or a special committee, apportion the amount asked of it among the churches.

One hundred years ago Adoniram Judson and Luther Rice went out to India as Congregational missionaries. By the study of the Bible they became Baptists. This fact aroused the Baptists of America to undertake Foreign Missions in an organized way.

There can no grander theme engross the attention of all classes than the subject of training the intellect.

The subject of education is fraught with a deep interest to all who understand its true merits. It should be of interest to all persons inasmuch as the happiness of all classes and persons is connected with it.

We can say nothing good of ignorance; nothing good can come of it. Ignorance is destructive. "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge. Because thou hast rejected knowledge I will also reject thee." Hosea 4:6.

"Wisdom is the principal thing, therefore get wisdom, and with all thy getting get understanding." Prov. 4:7.

This is the wise man's way of impressing the importance of getting all the knowledge we can and applying it rightfully.

So christian education is what we should strive for and christian schools and colleges are what we should build and foster.

There has been no greater progress made on any line than on the subject of education and schools.

The reading of the report on education was followed by the reading of the report of the Board of Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School by the chairman of said board, J. H. Quinn.

responsible for the financial interest of the school. Previous to that time these responsibilities were assumed by the principal. This change has proven to be to the best interest of the school. After all outstanding accounts for these two years shall have been collected there will still be some shortage in running expenses.

Your board is pleased to report only two changes in faculty from last year, Miss Gwendolen English and Mr. T. L. Wilson, leaving to prosecute their studies in higher institutions. They were both faithful and efficient teachers and were held in highest esteem by their co-workers and the student body. Your school has suffered more in the past from frequent changes of principal than from any other cause, but we are pleased to report that Prof. Wm. J. Frances, a native of Haywood County, N. C., and a graduate of Wake Forest College, whose services were so very satisfactory last year, retains the principalship of the school. His long and successful experience in school management eminently fit him for the position he holds.

We are pleased to report that Prof. J. D. Huggins, who has been with the school from its birth and whose faithful services in its behalf are known wherever the school is known, remains assistant principal. Also that Miss Etta Curtis, who has been with us so long and has proven herself to be so well fitted for the position, remains lady principal. After the mother, we know of no one better fitted to have charge of the girls.

During the last scholastic year an art department was added to the school and Miss Bessie Rodgers, of Raleigh, N. C., a graduate of Meredith College and a most talented and successful teacher, was placed in charge of this department and continues in charge thereof. The work in this department has succeeded beyond our most sanguine expectations.

The following constitute the faculty for the present term: Wm. J. Francis, A.B., Bible Department; J. D. Huggins, A.B., Mathematics, Science, and Elocution; Miss Etta Curtis and Miss Hester Francis, Intermediate Department; Mrs. J. D. Huggins, A.B., Department of English; Miss Ezelia Hamrick, B.L., Latin and History; Miss Cornelia H. Barbee, Director of Music; Miss Bessie Rodgers, Assistant in Music; Miss Hester Francis, Commercial Department; Miss Bessie Rodgers, Department of Art, and Miss Rosa Kirby, Matron.

Report adopted.

Rev. J. M. Goode read the report on Education, which is as follows:

From time immemorial intellectual endowments and attainments have been crowned with the richest of honors. Men have ever worshiped at the shrine of intellect with a fearful idolatry.

The intellect is simply powerful when properly trained.

Education is development. It is not simply instructive; a collection of facts, a code of rules communicated by the teacher, but it is discipline, training, a working up of the dormant faculties, a development of the latent powers, a growth of the mind.

items of cost were partially met by collections taken at the last sessions of the two Associations. The total received to date on these collections aggregated \$210.04, while the actual disbursements by the treasurer on the above two items of expenditure aggregated \$259.05, making a balance due the treasurer on account of these two items \$49.01. A part of the wood-work on the rear of the building on the exterior and all of the interior of the woodwork is in need of painting. The brick ought to be painted also.

Through the persistent efforts of Prof. J. D. Huggins, assisted by a number of the students and loyal friends of the school, an acetyline plant has been installed for the benefit of the school, without direct expense to your board or to the school. The actual contract price of this plant was \$1,127.71. Professor Huggins, who is agent for the company from whom the plant was purchased, has given the school more than his commission on the plant, which generosity is very much appreciated by your board. The generator is of 300 light capacity and is enclosed within a small house at the rear of the main building. The main building has been equipped with 108 lights and the boys' dormitory with 27 lights. The Boiling Springs Baptist church will be supplied with lights from this plant. The generator is large enough to supply the requirements of the institution should other buildings in the future be erected. Professor Huggins informs us that while many churches and individuals have contributed to the purchase of this plant there is yet due on same a balance of \$476.29. It is desired that all churches that have not contributed to this improvement make an effort to do something at an early date. This system of lighting is almost ideal, the lights being pleasant to the eye and the cost of maintenance and the possibility of accident being reduced to a minimum. A nominal charge will be made to the students for lights.

Through the faithful efforts of Professor Francis and other leading citizens of the community a very deep well has just been completed for the joint use of this school, the public school and the Baptist church. This will insure the best of water near the building. This improvement is, also, without expense to your board or to your school.

Through the efforts of Miss Curtis and the Civic League the yard has been beautified, concrete walks constructed, and the yard enclosed by an iron railing.

A memorial arch was presented to the Trustees at the last commencement by the senior class. It stands at the southeast corner of the main building.

The school opened on August 13th and will close April 25th, allowing one week for Christmas holidays. An early opening and closing is advantageous to many of our patrons. The total enrollment to date for the present session is 200, there being 103 males and 97 females. This is 29 more than last year at this time and is the largest enrollment at this season in the history of the school.

The young ladies and lady teachers room in the main building, while the young men occupy the other two dormitory buildings and rooms in private homes. The board, appreciating the importance of having the Principal at all times on the school grounds, has arranged for the Principal to occupy the Moore cottage, which is situated near the new boys' building. The building is now being enlarged and otherwise improved and will soon be ready for occupancy.

A distinguishing characteristic of this school is the moral atmosphere that prevails at all times. Potent factors in this line are the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A. membership in these is not compulsory, but both are well attended. All students are required to attend church and Sunday school each

Sunday. Special stress is placed upon the Bible department of the school. Only recently a successful series of revival services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. Balus Cade, assisted by the ministerial students of which we now have eleven in number.

The terms of the following members of this board from the Kings Mountain Association expire with this session, to wit: B. T. Falls, J. H. Quinn, S. H. Hamrick, G. H. Logan, and J. Y. Irvin; and the terms of the following from the Sandy Run Association expire with the present session, to wit: Rev. H. D. Harrill, D. M. Harrill, and W. A. Martin. The Sandy Run Association will also appoint two to fill vacancies caused by removal of Rev. J. M. Hamrick and by the resignation of Dr. T. B. Lovelace.

The Indebtedness.

While the last year has witnessed the greatest reduction in the volume of the indebtedness of the school made in any one year, yet your board reasonably expected a much larger reduction in view of the action of many of the churches last year in formally assuming the payment of their apportionment of the indebtedness. We regret to state that we have already paid in interest alone since the beginning of the enterprise more than \$5,000. How much longer will the more than 13,000 members of these great Associations allow this suicidal policy to continue?

The total collections since last report on the old indebtedness aggregate \$3,646.78. Of this sum \$2,300 was paid on principal and \$1,346.78 on interest. This leaves approximately yet due on principal and interest \$12,500.

The aggregate sum of the distributive shares assumed by the churches of the two Associations at the last sessions thereof amounted to approximately \$7,500, about half the sum then due. Of course many of the churches had assumed and paid their distributive shares, in whole or in part, prior to that time. Of the sum so assumed last year only about one-half has been paid to date, thus leaving about \$3,800 of the sum assumed unpaid. Assuming that this will yet be paid by the churches assuming it, there yet remains of the indebtedness unprovided for about \$8,700.

Your board most earnestly recommends that the churches that have already pledged to this cause proceed at once to raise same or to execute a joint note by the members thereof to be used by your board in the discharge of the indebtedness, and that the churches that have not already formally assumed the payment of their distributive shares of the indebtedness be asked to do so at the present session of the two Associations, and that individuals be urged to subscribe a sufficient sum to make up the deficit. Where the cash can not be raised in the near future your board urges the execution of notes to cover the subscriptions.

The following churches have to date paid their distributive share of the indebtedness with interest: Zoar, Sandy Plains, Lattimore, Elizabeth, and Mt. Zion, and the following churches have paid their apportionment alone: Shelby, Zion, Mt. Pleasant (C), Green Creek, Caroleen, Henrietta, High Shoals, Pleasant Hill, Ross's Grove, Fair View, First Broad, Camp's Creek, Cherokee Creek, Mt. Sinai.

At a recent meeting of this board a resolution was unanimously adopted urging each church in the two Associations to make ministerial education in the Boiling Springs High School one of the fixed objects for which the church makes annual contributions. This assistance is needed by the school to enable it to compete successfully with other schools in this section that receive assistance either from public funds or from the Home Mission Board.

Your board again urges both Associations at their present sessions to make heroic efforts to lift this tremendous burden off our school that the

cause of education may prosper in our midst and that God may be glorified thereby.

On motion the Moderator was empowered to appoint a committee to nominate five brethren to fill vacancies now existing on the Board of Trustees of the Boiling Springs School.

C. T. Tew, J. M. Goode, and W. M. Gold were appointed on said committee.

Rev. B. P. Jackson read the report of the Committee on Time and Place of Next Meeting as follows:

The report on State Missions was read by Rev. H. D. Harrill, and is as follows:

STATE MISSIONS.

The Work of Last Year: There were 152 missionaries, who preached at 351 points. They reported 1,921 baptisms and 1,429 received by letter, making total addition 3,348. Ten churches were organized; fifty church buildings were in course of construction and fourteen completed. These churches contributed as follows: To pastor's salary, \$25,432.05; church building, \$32,510.51; objects of the Convention, \$11,021.96; other objects, \$5,011.42; grand total, \$73,975.74.

The mission churches put back into the denominational treasury last year \$27,444.93 more than we put into State Missions.

This Year's Book: We are operating on a basis of \$50,000. This does not include \$2,500 for Sunday school work.

We have had this year 153 missionaries. Several of the mission points that were added last year come off the board and we have opened up a new field.

Church Building Fund: Three years ago \$5,000 of the amount contributed by the Woman's Missionary Society was set aside as a church building fund, and each year since this amount has been appropriated to church building. During this time fifteen or twenty church buildings have been aided and at least \$40,000 added to the value of our denominational wealth in church property. The money spent in church building is one of the wisest investments the board has ever made. A much larger sum could profitably be used in this way if it was placed at the disposal of the board.

The Work of Development: Our board has made a proposition to the Home Mission Board looking to a joint work to be conducted by the two boards for the development of our churches along the line of development. Two or three district missionaries are to be employed to aid the pastors in associational campaigns by holding institutes and mission rallies at churches. The Home Board has agreed to enter into this cooperative work on a small scale as an experiment.

The rapid material development of our State makes it the more imperative that we prosecute State Missions with renewed vigor, as our religious progress depends largely upon the successful prosecution of our State Mission work.

The following resolution was read and adopted as supplementary to the report on State Missions:

Whereas, Baptists are the guardians of the religious foundations of Democracy, and the modern republic can not long endure in ignorance of the religious essentials of Democracy, it behooves North Carolina Baptists to make Baptist principles felt in every educational center of our State. Therefore be it Resolved:

1. That the State Mission Board be encouraged in maintaining an efficient Sunday School hard by every-day school and college in North Carolina; that this Association assert its approval of the State Mission Board's desire to support the strongest possible preacher in every educational center of the State; that this Association go on record as favoring a denominational policy that will ultimately put an adequate house of worship in every important educational center of our State.

2. That it is the sense of this Association that the way should be cleared for working out this policy by the denomination's coming to the aid of the Wake Forest Baptist church in supplying our own Wake Forest College with a house of worship ample for taking care of all the students that may ever go to Wake Forest to study.

3. That some denominational agency should be empowered to push this matter, so that at least every three years a new, ample church building shall be erected in one of our principal educational centers of the State until all of them are supplied with churches.

Remarks were made on the foregoing report and resolution by H. D. Harrill, W. L. Barrs, and C. T. Tew.

Report was then adopted.

Rev. W. M. Gold read the following report on temperance:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We, your Committee on Temperance, beg leave to report as follows:

That since the voters of North Carolina drove the saloon from the State prohibition has proven worthy of the high sentiment and strenuous effort which placed it on our statute books. We find at the same time prohibition has not entirely eradicated the evil and gospel temperance has not yet conquered the liquor curse.

We would urge that every friend of temperance make a special effort this year to hold not only the ground already won, but that we pray the prayer and help the fight that will enforce our laws in such a way as to bring about the complete annihilation of the liquor curse in our State and country. We

also recommend that this body petition the Congress of the United States to pass the Webb-Kenyon Interstate Liquor Shipment Bill, which will protect our State largely from liquor shipments from other States. We give our full endorsement to the work of the Anti-Saloon League and think it worthy of our financial and moral support.

We would also impress on the friends of temperance to be more than ever alert to see that temperance men only be put in office for the purpose of enforcing prohibitory laws; that the education of the youth of our country for prohibition be taken up and continued in real earnest; that the cause is not left to the mercy of politicians, and that the advance made already shall be held at any price.

Called to order by the Moderator. Prayer by B. P. Green. In the absence of the Clerk, G. B. Pruett acted as Clerk pro tem.

Read and adopted the minutes of yesterday.

The report on obituaries was read as follows:

By examination of the church letters your committee finds that since our last meeting the Lord has been pleased to remove from among us forty-three of our members, among whom we wish to make special mention of Brother James Irvin, who was a member and deacon of the Big Spring church and an earnest worker in the cause of the Master.

Each year a number of our members are called to meet the Great Judge. May we all heed the Saviour's warning, "Be ye also ready."

We, your committee, beg to report that we find that the majority of our pastors are not paid enough for their work.

Realizing the fact that the progress of the church depends largely upon the faithful work of the pastors, we recommend that we pay them more for their labors. We recommend that the heads of families give to their children with the understanding that they pay the pastor with their own money, thereby educating them to give.

The word of the Lord teaches us very plainly to give of our substance to the men of God who are instrumental in ministering unto us spiritual things.

We suggest that all our churches pay their pastors a sufficient sum to enable them to give their entire time to the work; a sum sufficient that will enable the pastor to visit the homes of his flock and pray with them and talk with them concerning the church work.

We would not recommend a pastor to urge his church too strongly for money. This might have a tendency to hurt his influence with the members. But we do recommend that the ladies of the various churches put forth their best efforts to raise the salaries of the pastors in order that the above results may be accomplished.

The report on ministerial relief was then adopted.

Rev. B. P. Green read the following

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We find from the statistics of last year that all but three of our churches report Sunday schools. We hope for a good Sunday school report this year.

The population of our State is 2,210,000. Statistics show 550,000 in all Sunday schools, or about one in four. The average attendance is less than sixty per cent of the enrollment, so that on an average Sunday only about 330,000 are present in all Sunday schools. Many can not go. There are 270,000 babies under three years of age. Many mothers can not go. There are many people kept away because of age, sickness, etc.

Make all necessary deduction and then we have 1,000,000 people not reached in any way for the Sunday school.

Surely these facts call for many to go out into the streets and lanes and into the highways and hedges and compel them to come in.

We have 6,400 members in this Association and only 4,050 enrolled in the Sunday schools. We hope this will not be true next year, but that every church will try to have as many enrolled in their Sunday schools as they have church members.

We believe every member of our church who is able should attend Sunday school.

The report on the Orphanage was read by Rev. C. M. Teal as follows:

As Baptists we are justly proud of our Orphanage at Thomasville. No object lies quite so near the hearts of our people as does the Orphanage. Beginning twenty-seven years ago, the growth, development and success of our Thomasville Baptist Orphanage has been marvelous.

It is surprising to know that nearly 1,500 fatherless ones have received shelter, food, and instruction, and that now about four hundred are receiving its nurture and care. How different the life of these boys and girls might have been but for the fostering care of our Orphanage. How many might have grown up with little or no education, and perhaps would have suffered, possibly would have fallen into crime and disgrace.

But with the care these children have at this institution many of them have gone out into the world to bless humanity, and to be happy and prosperous citizens.

During the year Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy donated to the institution one of the most remarkable gifts that has ever come to any institution in North Carolina. It consists of 1,200 acres of farming land in the fertile section of Lenoir County. This means much for us.

Notwithstanding much has been done, much remains to be done. The contributions for the year have been splendid, and the crop prospect for this year is better than it was this time last year.

God has wonderfully blessed the institution from its beginning and will continue to do so as long as we are true to the trust placed in our hands.

Charity and Children should have a wider circulation, as it would keep the people informed and thus help the work on.

We recommend that every Sunday school in this Association set apart the first Sunday in each month as Orphanage day and that each church make a yearly offering on Thanksgiving Day.

The report on Woman's Work was read by G. B. Pruett as follows:

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK.

Woman's work has become one of the most potent factors in the Kingdom of the Lord for advancement of his cause among Southern Baptists. Every pastor in whose Church there is a live Woman's Mission Society at work feels that he has in the women of the Church a right hand support, and a society in a church means progress along all lines for the church. This statement is abundantly justified by the progress made by the churches of the Sandy Run Association in the past seven years. Seven years ago the gifts to missions by the Sandy Run Association amounted to about \$900.00. The last report shows that the Association gave last year more than \$1,700. That is, we have almost doubled our gifts in seven years. This advancement is due largely to the influence of woman's work upon our churches. The Woman's Missionary Union, if properly conducted, informs the women of the needs and conditions of the destitute fields; teaches one's duty and obligation to the great work of saving the lost, and in a word stands for the training and developing of our women so that they may discharge their duty to the cause.

Recently the women of the Sandy Run Association held their first annual meeting apart from the regular session of the Association in Forest City, and the meeting in every way was a great success. We would recommend the holding of the woman's meeting separate from the Association. All the societies should make their reports every quarter.

On motion the Clerk was instructed to have minutes printed and distributed and to retain ten dollars out of Minute Fund for his services,

On motion, reappointed G. B. Pruett, B. P. Green and J. R. Matheny Sunday School Missionaries to work in the bounds of the Association during the next year; the duties of these brethren to be to visit the different churches in the interest of the Sunday School cause and to create a more general interest among our people in the all-important work of Sunday Schools. Let us hope that these brethren may have the hearty co-operation of all the churches, that the great work may be given such an impetus in our midst that all our people may become more generally interested and understand more fully the great possibilities of doing good through this channel of the Lord's work.

The committee on religious exercises reported the following program for tomorrow, viz:

G. B. Pruett to conduct a Sunday School mass meeting in the church Sunday morning at 10 o'clock; Rev. Z. D. Harrill to preach in the church at 11 a. m., and Rev. T. J. Moss to preach at the stand at the same hour.

On motion, adjourned to meet tomorrow at 10 a. m.

Sunday morning: Met at 10 a. m. in Sunday School mass meeting with G. B. Pruett leading. Prayer by C. M. Teal. Short talks were made on the subject of Sunday schools, their importance and duty of our people to encourage them by T. J. Moss and J. F. Lowery.

At 11 a. m. Rev. Z. D. Harrill preached in the house, and Rev. T. J. Moss at the stand.

At the close of the services a collection for State Missions was taken, amounting to \$10.73.

The congregations were then dismissed and the Association adjourned to meet with the Sandy Run Church at Mooresboro, N. C., on Thursday before the second Sunday in October, 1913.

Thus ended the twenty-third session of the Sandy Run Association, and one of the best sessions in its history. The session was well attended by the delegates from the different churches and by the people of the surrounding country. Much praise is due the members of the Mt. Olivet church and the good citizens of the surrounding community for the princely manner in which they entertained the delegates and visitors.

We feel that much good will result from this meeting. May God's blessings rest upon every one who in any way contributed to the success of the session,

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We find authority for Sunday Schools in God's word. The fact that Sunday Schools, with good organization, adequate equipment, and good teaching, is sure to become effective in winning souls for God and developing them for His use, is proof of God's favor.

The Sunday School work of the State is hopeful. There seems to be a steady, healthful growth. Since 1905 we have grown from 1,290 schools to 1,920 in 1912; a gain of 631 or a gain of 49% in seven years. Mere numerical growth, however, is not necessarily indicative of success. We find more general interest in the cause than formerly. Schools are improving their organization as well as enlarging their membership. Many are training their teachers in the Sunday School Board's training courses. Churches are building class rooms or using curtains to improve their equipment.

We find the following facts about the work in our Association: There is a Sunday School in every church in the Association with the exception of two, there is also several branch schools. We are more and more convinced that we pay too little attention to the purely local work in our Association. This Association needs a good live Sunday School man, who has the work upon his heart, to do active work among the church members who do not attend the Sunday School, as well as among those who are not members of our churches. If the Sunday School work ever amounts to much in our churches the work must be done by and for the individual church.

As a policy for next year we would recommend the following:

1. A vigorous campaign to enlist more of our church members and others not reached for the Sunday School. A religious census followed by grading the school will greatly aid in this.

2. The organization of Teacher Training Classes for officers and teachers. These may pursue the Normal Course or the Reading Course. Free literature will explain both courses.

3. More definite plans for making our schools evangelistic. These ought to become great soul-saving agencies. Every unsaved member of our classes ought to be brought to a saving knowledge of Jesus.

4. That our officers and teachers secure literature on the various phases of up-to-date Sunday School work. This will be furnished free by our Sunday School secretary.

5. The co-operation with other Associations in supporting Sunday School Missions by putting this fund on same basis as the other mission and benevolent objects of the Convention. The Sunday Schools, however, ought to meet this obligation.

Therefore, we recommend that every preacher, superintendent of Sunday Schools and every parent in the Sandy Run Association take the Recorder for one year and thereby increase the number of subscribers and the usefulness of our church paper. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
BOILING SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL

To the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Associations:

The Board of Trustees of Boiling Springs High School begs leave to submit this, its sixth annual report:

Under the able management of Prof. W. J. Francis and his able corps of assistants your school has made gratifying progress along all lines and is steadily and surely gaining in usefulness. Considering the quality of work done, the ability of the teaching force to give instruction, together with the natural advantage which your school enjoys, and, further considering the low cost to students, your Board asserts without fear of contradiction that this school stands without a peer in this field. The substantial progress of Christianity is conditioned upon and co-existent with the like progress of Christian intelligence. The success and growth of the Baptist denomination, as such, is strengthened, fortified and advanced by the agencies of Christian denominational schools, where our ministers and missionaries receive their initial training and our boys and girls are taught the fundamental principles of good citizenship. Your Board has pursued the policy of employing only graduate teachers from reputable colleges, which policy, though more expensive, has won a high place in that realm where only the best schools are found.

Your board has made but few changes in the faculty. Miss Margaret C. Radcliffe, B. A., M. M., Roanoke College, Danville, Va., is this year Directress of Music. She comes to us highly recommended and is doing excellent work in this department, maintaining the popularity of this important branch in our school. Prof. Roy A. Marsh, A. B., Wake Forest College, is an addition to the faculty. Prof. Marsh has charge of the boys' dormitory, is popular with the student body, and is doing excellent work as Professor of English and Latin.

Space and time forbid us giving individual mention of each of our teachers. However, we consider it appropriate to call your attention to the strong asset which the school has in the services of Miss Etta Curtis as Lady Principal and teacher in the intermediate Department. Miss Curtis has charge of the dormitory for girls, than which there is no more important or responsible work in any school. A lady of refined culture, kind and sympathetic, rich in experience, firm and steadfast in purpose and prizing the cardinal virtues above everything else, your Board can safely assure the parents that their girls will be safe when under her care and tuition.

Your board further commends its boarding facilities as be-

ing of the best. Board is furnished at actual cost. Miss Rosa Kirby is matron. She is a graduate in Domestic Science and knows how to practice economy with the maximum of efficiency. Not a single complaint against board has ever reached this board, either from student or patron, during the entire time Miss Kirby has been our Matron. Meals are good and wholesome and the cost has never exceeded the low average of \$6 per month for the year.

Improvements

As evidence of the civic pride of the student body, we refer to the improvements made by them alone. They have equipped Miss Curtis' reception room with splendid furniture and painted this room, the office room, the music room and the practice room during the past year. The Literary Societies have established and are cultivating flower gardens at each end of the Main building.

The Board has sold the ram originally purchased to pump water from the spring and with the money received therefrom has purchased an engine to pump water from the deep well. The water from this well has been tested recently by the state chemist, whose analysis shows it to be as nearly perfect as it is possible for water to be.

The class of 1912 established a precedent by donating an arch to the school and each class in the future will give a suitable picture as a memorial to be used in decorating the walls of the building.

Indebtedness

Pursuant to a resolution offered by Bro. George L. English and adopted at your last meeting, an Advisory Committee of seven from each Association was appointed to confer with the Board and devise ways and means for the early liquidation of the indebtedness. The following were appointed from the Kings Mountain Association: George L. English, James T. Bowman, A. E. Bettis, J. W. Kendrick, D. J. Keeter, J. T. S. Mauney, G. W. Hamrick and from the Sandy Run Association: A. M. Lovelace, M. M. Green, A. I. Jolly, Rev. J. M. Goode, J. P. D. Withrow, J. A. Calton, A. L. Smart.

This committee met at the Sandy Run Baptist church, together with the Board, on Oct. 17th, 1912. At this meeting the following pastors were present: Revs. Z. D. Harrill, A. C. Irvin, L. W. Swope, B. P. Green, Baylus Cade, D. G. Washburn, J. G. Graham, J. R. Miller, B. M. Bridges, I. D. Harrill.

J. H. Quinn was elected Chairman and Geo. L. English Secretary of the meeting. After an all day session, interspersed at intervals with fervent prayers, that plan was decided upon which

has resulted in the practical liquidation of the indebtedness. At this meeting \$4250 was subscribed. Subscriptions were to be taken conditioned upon the whole amount being subscribed and canvassers put in the field. The committee went away buoyant with the hope of success. Among those deserving special mention in canvassing the field are G. E. Lineberry, Geo. L. English, who managed with great skill the publicity department, J. W. Suttle, J. G. Graham, T. Carl Hamrick, C. T. Tew, J. M. Goode, E. B. Hamrick.

\$11,685.00 has been paid upon the indebtedness, leaving a balance of \$1,492.63 yet due. This amount is being held in the form of an individual note signed by a majority of the Board as individuals by L. S. Hamrick and the estate of the late Leander Holland. The Board at a recent meeting appointed Brethren W. A. Martin, G. B. Pruett, E. B. Hamrick, J. Y. Irvin and B. T. Falls as a special committee to urge the collection of those over-due subscriptions and to take such steps to collect same as they deemed necessary or expedient. A letter was addressed to a portion of those whose notes are being held on the 15th of Sept. and the remainder of the list is just in hand and will receive immediate attention. These notes and pledges range in amount from 50 cents to \$1.50 and the parties are scattered over the territory covered by the two associations. The list of the churches who have not met their pledges has not been received by the Committee and they would be at a loss to know to handle same if they had it. The latest to respond with the full amount of principal and interest is New Hope church with \$242.25. Whenever and wherever a consecrated, able and progressive pastor lays this matter earnestly before his church it is the observation of your Board that that church readily responds and does its full duty. Your board, therefore, feels constrained to urge your body to request the pastors to speak to those delinquent churches about this important matter.

The present session has seen 170 students enrolled, boys 102, girls 68, ministerial students 10, counties represented 15, states: North and South Carolina. There are more boarding students than ever before. The local patronage not being quite so large.

Under the wise management of Prof. Francis the school has each year been self-sustaining. It could not have done so last year but for the collection taken at the Association to help pay tuition for ministerial students who received free tuition from the Board. Your Board again urges that ministerial education for this school be made one of the objects to which contributions are made by the various church. The competitors of this school get aid from

the Southern Board to pay tuition for ministerial students. Your Board cannot charge them tuition without destroying the sphere of usefulness of the School. We cannot give them free tuition and pay expenses. So then "help us or we perish."

Needed Improvement

The school needs the following improvements, which your Board urges you to provide as soon as possible:

1. Furniture for the auditorium and recitation rooms.
2. Complete job of plumbing.
3. A heating plant for the main building.

The terms of the following members expire with this year, leaving vacancies to be filled, viz: L. S. Hamrick, E. B. Hamrick, J. F. Moore, Carme Elam, N. B. Kendrick, from Kings Mountain Association; and J. J. Edwards, G. B. Pruett and C. T. Tew from the Sandy Run Association.

The Principal reported at the last meeting of your Board that the order and deportment of the student body this year surpasses that of all previous years and is as nearly perfect as human agencies make it. Likewise, the entire student body are interested in their work, both in the class rooms and literary societies. The high moral atmosphere which has characterized the school in the past is again manifest this year in increased proportions. The student body maintains a Y. M. C. A. and a Y. W. C. A. All students are required to attend church and Sunday School each Sunday. Prayer meeting is held at the church on Thursday night, when all students have an opportunity to attend.

The graduating class last year was composed of 16 members, many of whom have gone to colleges, others teaching school and still other engaged in business.

In conclusion your Board desires to express their thanks and appreciation to the loyal friends who have stood by the school and helped them to relieve the school from an oppressing debt, many of whom wrought nobly and made great personal sacrifices. We trust that a portion of God's richest blessings will attend them and that His Kingdom will be broadened and hastened in the earth thereby.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your committee on education has the honor of presenting the following report: The word education is derived from the latin word *educ*, which means to draw out, as to enlarge or expand the thinking powers, and is translated from the latin word *E-d-o-ceo* which means to train thoroughly or to educate. So it comprehends all that is meant by training and all the improvement that is made on the mind.

According to Jules Simon "Education is the process by which one mind forms another mind and one heart another heart."

According to Herbert Spencer, "Education is preparation to live completely."

According to Pestilozzi, "Education is the full and harmonious development of all the powers of the child."

According to Plato, "The purpose of education is to give to the body and to the soul all the beauty and all the perfection of which they are capable." These definitions being true, it is of the utmost importance to do all we can to educate.

Parents should feel the responsibility for the child's education, because if left to the child it may not realize the need until it is too late. Parents can not be too careful to see that their children are educated in the right direction.

Education may be right or wrong, good or bad. Reason may grow strong in error and revel in falsities. The heart may be caused to grow in vice. It is as difficult to unlearn ones errors as to acquire knowledge. Error is more hopeless than ignorance, for error is the more busy.

Ignorance is a blank sheet on which we may write, but error is a scribbled one from which we must first erase. Ignorance will stand still but error will advance in the wrong direction.

Be careful, parents to educate your children, but be more careful to educate them morally and religiously.

The child is capable of being educated physically, intellectually, and spiritually. Train him in all of these and you have a true servant. A christian school is the only place where children and young people can be educated right.

We are glad to note the growing interest in our country in religious education and christian schools.

The report on the Orphanage was read by B. P. Green and the subject discussed by B. P. Green and Archibald Johnson. The report was adopted and reads as follows:

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The first child was received into the Orphanage November 11th, 1885; 28 years ago. Since that time 1,420 children have been enrolled and the present number is 411. Average cost of child is \$100 a year. Children are received between the ages of 5 and 12, and dismissed according to preparation. Two great gifts have been made this year, 375 acres of land estimated to be worth \$25,000 by Misses Mary and Victoria Galloway. The other is Dr. S. W. Little \$25,000. Other smaller gifts have been made. Bequests are usually put in some permanent memorial to the giver and not to buy meat and bread for the children. The most careful attention is given to sanitary conditions, cleanliness of buildings, grounds, as well as personal cleanliness being rigidly required.

About 175 acres of land are under cultivation, working 10 head of horses and mules. They have a growing herd of Holstien cattle for the dairy. The work of the school is carried through the 9th grade, but the work in the sewing room, kitchen, laundry, printing office, shoe shop and on the farm, all are a part of a system of education. The great work of the Orphanage is in surrounding the children with a moral atmosphere and instructing them in spiritual things. They have a well organized Sunday School and church with Baraca and Philathea classes and a Missionary Society. About 40% of the current fund comes from the monthly collections in the Sunday Schools, and yet only about one-third of the Baptist Schools in North Carolina are giving in these collections. Let every School in this Association give to this worthy object. We recommend that every School and Church take a collection on Thanksgiving Day for the Orphanage.

Resolved 2nd, That having determined the amounts desired to be raised by the Sandy Run Association, the Executive Committee then proceed to apportion these amounts out among the several churches.

Resolved 3rd, That the Deacons and Finance Committees of the churches be requested to apportion the amount to be raised by the church among the individual members of the church.

Resolved 4th, That the amounts apportioned to the churches be published in table in the minutes, and that the Executive Committee be requested to follow up this work carefully and keep themselves in touch with the pastors and officers of the churches during the year, and to do their utmost to induce the churches to pay the amounts apportioned to them.

The committee on Time and Place of next meeting of the Association made the following report: Time, Thursday before the second Sunday in October, 1914. Place, Green's Creek church in Polk county. Post office, Landrum, S. C., Route 1. Introductory sermon by Rev. G. G. O'Neal. alternate Rev. W. M. Gold.

Saturday Morning Session.

The exercises of the day were opened at 9.30 a. m. by a devotional service conducted by Rev. W. M. Gold. The services consisted of singing by the choir, reading of the Scripture by Brother Gold and prayers led by Revs. R. L. Limrick, J. W. Suttle and D. J. Hunt.

Read and adopted the minutes of yesterday.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Our Lord's command as found in Acts 1:8 is, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judea, and in Samaria and unto the uttermost parts of the earth"

We find by this that the work of preaching the Word and rescuing the lost world is to begin at home and extend unto the uttermost parts of the earth. There is no part of the work more important than Home Missions. The object of Home Missions is to help the destitution of the South, such as the mountain section of our southern States, the foreign population of our cities and also Cuba and Porto Rico. There has been a great work done in this way and some of the

Lord's servants have made great sacrifices and borne heavy burdens to accomplish this work.

Opportunity never was greater to do this work than now and the future of our Southland largely depends on the manner we treat this opportunity. Let us remember that the work of Home Missions is growing and therefore requires a great increase in our contributions to this cause.

We, your committee, also recommend that our pastors and laymen subscribe for and read mission literature, such as the Home Field, the Home Mission Task, etc., all of which can be had from the Home Board at a small cost.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your committee on Foreign Missions submit the following: We generally consider what we have done for Foreign Missions, but it is well for us to consider sometimes what Foreign Missions have done for us, as Southern Baptists. If any one will merely look at the history of our denomination since we commenced to work for world-wide missions he will see that there has been a wonderful development, and we believe that this has been caused largely by the world-wide view which was taken.

Surely we ought to rejoice in a work which brings to us the blessings of larger vision, better education, union, liberty, spirituality and which helps to save not only to the uttermost parts of the earth, but us and our children from selfishness and sordidness. The prosecution of world-wide missions brings the richest blessings, and of these none is greater than the abiding presence of our Lord.

When we look back over our receipts for a few years we see how wonderfully God has blessed us. In 1873 the Convention for the first time had its contributions to go beyond \$50,000. Then in 1890 there was rejoicing when the receipts went beyond \$100,000. In 1903 we first went beyond \$200,000. In 1907 we went beyond \$400,000, and in

1912 beyond \$580,000. In the mean time great advance has been made on the foreign fields.

We stand in a day of momentous opportunity in the work of God. Never before was the whole world so open to the message of God's redeeming love. Never before were there such facilities for transportation and inter-communication. Never before were there so many nations of the earth under Christian rulers as to-day. The powers of heathenism and Mohametanism have given way before the powers of the Christian nations. Never before were there so many thousands turning to the Lord.

Some societies died last year, still we had a gain of three. There are now W. M. S's 13; Y. W. A's 3; Sunbeams 5; R. A's 2, making a total of 23.

The apportionment for Woman's Work last year was \$550.00 but they raised \$594.50. This shows that Woman's Work in the Sandy Run Association is waking up. God forbid that it shall ever go backward.

For several reasons, sometime before the last meeting Mrs. A. H. McDaniel, who had filled the office of Vice-President for three years, resigned. Miss Mary Washburn, of Rutherfordton, Route 1, was elected to fill the vacancy. The ladies feel that their greatest need next to prayer is information. Dear brethren help them to get it.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND PROHIBITION TO SANDY RUN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Having been appointed by the association to prepare this report, I have been trying to learn the situation throughout the State and nation so that I might make an intelligent report.

I find that the question of temperance reform is being agitated throughout the nation. Remarkable success has been achieved in the last ten or fifteen years, until now fifty-three per cent of the people, living in over two-thirds of the area of this nation, have outlawed the traffic; and there is a well organized and determined movement on the part of the Church, led by the Anti-Saloon League, to write Prohibition in the Constitution of the United States. Already there is pending in Congress a resolution which will submit this proposition to the various States, and the idica-

tions are that in the not distant future this resolution will be passed by Congress. This does not mean national prohibition, but it does mean that the question is being submitted to the States and when three-fourths of the States (thirty-six) shall, through their Legislatures, ratify this amendment it will become a part of the Constitution. The temperance workers of the nation calculate that by earnest endeavor and persistent activity this can be accomplished in the next eight or ten years. An undertaking so worthy and a task so difficult ought to command the respect, the sympathy, and the support of every Church and every Church member in this Association.

Virginia, the first State to vote on State-wide prohibition this fall, has gone dry, and it is confidently predicted that Washington and Colorado will vote dry, and that in 1915 there are likely to be not less than one-half dozen State-wide prohibition campaigns.

I learned from literature and personal information from Rev. R. L. Davis, Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, that the conditions in our State are good, that municipal, county and State officers are more active in enforcing the law than they have been heretofore, that the people are more willing to give evidence and are more determined that lawless liquor-selling must cease. The action of the State Democratic Convention last June, declaring that drinking, drunkenness, and the crimes which follow are decreasing, is a forward step for a political party and deserves the commendation of right thinking people.

We learned further that the Anti-Saloon League is leading a campaign to pass a law at the next General Assembly to prohibit the delivery of liquor for beverage purposes in North Carolina, that various Churches, Sunday Schools, and young peoples' societies have endorsed this movement, that a good many of those who have been nominated for the Legislature have expressed themselves as favorable to this measure, and that if the Church is properly active in the next six months we will be able to pass this measure.

I, therefore, recommend that this Association put itself on record as heartily favoring such a bill and that to this end we memorialize the next General Assembly to enact such legislation.

I recommend again that all our Sunday Schools observe November first as World's Temperance Sunday and at that time give their children an opportunity to sign the total abstinence pledge. I am informed that the Anti-Saloon League of America has issued a splendid program for the observance of this day and that these programs will be sent free, as many as are needed, to

any Sunday School, on application from the proper officer and I advise the superintendents to write to Dr. Howard H. Russell, Westerville, Ohio, about this.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

There seems to be some progress in all lines of the Sunday School work. While there is being a great deal done in the way of Sunday School work there is a lot still undone. In the State of North Carolina we have 245,000 Church members; only 85,000 in Sunday School—where are the others? One hundred and sixty thousand not in Sunday School. We have 190,000 pupils enrolled in our Sunday Schools. Eighty-five thousand Church members, 105,000 non-Church members. Statistics show only about 50,000 present on any one Sunday; about 145,000 absent every Sunday. To improve these conditions is one of our tasks at present. Fully 55 per cent of our enrollments are not Church members—this with 270,000 babies not old enough to attend Sunday School; but with 65,000 getting old enough every year, and 1,000,000 other people old enough, but not reached by any Sunday School, gives us some idea of the task that is before us.

We find that the Sunday School work in our own, the Sandy Run Association, is progressing. That the Churches are realizing the necessity of better equipped buildings, some are building new houses of Worship, class-rooms, and all modern improvements for Sunday School work. Others are adding to and providing rooms in their houses all ready built and also that the Sunday School workers are awakening to the necessity of better preparation for teaching. We have provided for the Normal Course, which gives instructions on all phases of the modern Sunday School work. And a great many Sunday School workers have, and are, taking advantage of this course to better prepare themselves for work. And we recommend that our Churches and Sunday Schools aid our State Secretary in his work in every way they can. We have Sunday Schools in nearly all of our Churches. A large number of them have perenial schools while a few of them hibernate in winter.

We find encouragement inasmuch as there seems to be a steady growth along all lines of the Sunday School work.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board is doing a great and important work. Indeed, there is no work in which we are engaged that presents to Southern Baptists problems of such stupendous magnitude—problems that appeal to our patriotism as well as to our loyalty to Christ as does the work of the Home Mission Board.

The Board is laboring among the foreign population in our great cities and on the frontier of Texas and the West, among the Indians in Oklahoma, and the Negroes of the South, and in education work in Mountain Schools, and lines of work have also been thrown out to Cuba and the Canal Zone.

A special and engaging feature of the Board's work is Evangelism by which scores of hundreds are being added to the Churches every year.

There are some grave difficulties that confront the Board. For instance, there are more than three thousand Baptist Churches in the Board's territory that have no house of Worship. To meet this situation the Board is making an effort to raise a million dollar Church building fund from which gifts and loans will be made to Churches struggling to erect houses of Worship.

Another grave situation is the fact that there are ten thousand Baptist Churches in the territory of the Board that gave absolutely nothing to Home Missions last year. This is over 42 percent of all the Churches constituting the Convention. To meet this situation the department of "Enlistment and Co-operation" has been organized with a view to cultivating these Churches and enlisting their interest in the work of the Board.

And then, there is the ever pressing need of more money with which to carry on and enlarge the work. The resources of the Board are wholly inadequate to meet the increasing demands of the growing work from year to year.

In view of these things what is the duty of the hour? Why to make an earnest effort, not only to secure a liberal offering from every Church in the Sandy Run Association, but through the Churches to secure a contribution from every individual member of every Church. Until this is done we will not have measured up to our full responsibility to the great cause of Home Missions.

6. In accomplishment it is among us the one great unifying agency: Territorially, making neighbors of widely separated Churches; organically, relating each reader to the whole of our State denominational work; doctrinally, binding us together in our views of Bible truth and duty.

7. In outlook, after nearly four score years of usefulness, the Biblical Recorder today, with larger circulation than ever before, with growing work to chronicle and to do, with widening life to present, with and enlarging prospect to beckon onward, rejoices in the hearty endorsement of our leaders and fellow-workers in the Lord.

Believing in view of these things that the Recorder should have a place by every Baptist fireside in North Carolina, we invoke

and urge hearty co-operation of all people in immediately and greatly increasing its circulation.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Foreign Mission Board located at Richmond, Va., conducts work in the following countries: Africa, Argentine, Uruguay, Brazil, Italy, Japan, Mexico and China.

We have in Africa four main stations. There are three independent, self-supporting churches in Lagos with a membership of over 500 which are the direct result of our work. We have 21 day schools with 536 students. We have in Africa 11 Missionaries, 17 churches, 969 members.

The Argentine Mission. The work here is divided into three main stations—Buenos Aires, Rosario and Montevideo in Uruguay. On this field we have 16 missions, 13 churches, 610 members, 112 baptisms for the year.

Brazil. Brazil is divided into two missions, north and south Brazil. Brazil is regarded as being one of the ripest fields on the face of the earth. If we had men and means a large harvest could be reaped. Perhaps there is no place on earth more destitute than the Amazon Valley where Rev. E. A. Wilson is working alone. The Board has recently appointed a number of young people for the work here in Brazil. Here we have 43 missionaries, 159 churches, 11,006 members. We have two schools, the Rio Baptist College, with 291 students and Seminary with 17; also schools for girls.

At Rio is located the Brazilian Baptist Publishing house, the gift of \$30,000 by Mr. Carroll of Alabama.

Italy. We have three missionary couples in Rome, and the work is divided in three district spheres. The North Italian Mis-

sion extending north of the city of Rome into the adjacent parts of the Continent of Europe, under Dr. Gill; the South Italian Mission extending south from Rome into Sicily, Sardinia and North Africa, under Rev. J. P. Stuart. We have on the field six missionaries, 42 churches, and 1314 members.

Japan. We have seven missions stationed in Japan; all located in the south. A new day of opportunity has opened many of the leaders who are not christians are beginning to feel that christianity is the hope of the future. Only 20 per cent of the people have been reached, while 40,000,000 are without the knowledge of Jesus. We have 18 missionaries, 10 churches, 617 members, one school.

Mexico. Mexico is organized into two missions, the north and the south mission, notwithstanding the condition because of the war the baptisms have increased. We have 30 missionaries, 42 churches, 2208 members, 16 schools.

China. China is our largest and oldest field. The work is divided into five missions, north, south, the Pakhoi, Central and Interior. Missionaries 154, churches 97, members 3267, baptisms 3073. Almost as many baptisms as there are church members. We have 17 hospitals and dispensaries, treated 66,823.

The work of the Board this year is projected on a \$658,250. Your committee recommends that this Association undertake to raise \$650.00.

REPORT ON EDUCATION

We are taught in the Book of Books to seek knowledge. Solomon begged God for wisdom; and that wise man says in Proverbs: "It is better to get wisdom than gold." He also says: "A man is stronger; yea, a man of knowledge increaseth strength."

All through the ages, men of knowledge have ruled the world. All through the ages, men have been striving to obtain knowledge. Hundreds of years ago, wise men saw the need of institutions of learning and they were established. The first public schools in the United States were established in 1642. Now every state in the union fosters public schools. Public school houses adorn every hill-top in our own state. We have our own Wake Forest College for our boys, Meredith and Chowan Colleges for our girls; and fifteen Baptist High Schools for our boys and girls. We find these Colleges and Schools are well attended—some filled to overflowing.

We urge our people to foster and patronize our own Schools and Colleges, as there they obtain not only a literary education, but are trained in that knowledge sought by the early disciples in the great school of Christ. These schools are the hot-beds from which we expect to draw the leaders in our denominational work.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

BOILING SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL

To the King's Mountain and Sandy Run Associations:

For the seventh time, the Board of Trustees of Boiling Springs High School submits its annual report:

It is gratifying to your Board to be able to report that the passing of another year has brought to your school marked progress along all lines. All things considered, this has been the most successful year in its history. The thing that has been most pleasing to the Board and that means most for the future of the school is its rapid growth in favor among the friends of education generally and among the membership of these two Associations in particular. The latter appreciate more fully than ever before that it is their school—a child of the two Associations—and that it is their duty and nature to sustain it by liberal patronage that it may accomplish its great mission of diffusing Christian education.

Considering the ability and qualifications of the teaching force, the equipment and natural advantages of the school, and the low cost to students, your Board asserts, without fear of contradiction, that this school stands without a peer in its field. There is no other agency that is doing more for the growth and progress

of the Baptist denomination, as such, and for the cause of Christianity generally, throughout the State, than the system of secondary school and colleges controlled by the denomination throughout North Carolina. In these are trained our teachers, our ministers, our school workers, and our missionaries, and here our sons and daughters are taught the fundamental principles of good citizenship.

Your Board still adheres to the policy of employing as teachers only graduates of reputable colleges. This means more expense but it has placed your school in line with the best of its class in the land.

At the beginning of the present term several changes were made in the Faculty. Prof. W. J. Francis, former principal, Prof. A. Marsh and Miss Hester Francis retired at the close of last term. Prof. O. P. Hamrick, A. B., Wake Forest College, who succeeds Prof. Marsh, has charge of the boys' dormitory, and is Bursar for the school. Miss Euphemia Watson, a graduate in Art of Meredith College, has charge of the Art Department. Miss Nell Sholar succeeds Miss Francis in the Primary Department and is Assistant in Music. Your Board is pleased to announce that Prof. J. D. Huggins, who has been with the school from its organization and who has, at all times, labored so faithfully for its success, is now acting Principal and is succeeding admirably, as this report will indicate. Miss Margaret C. Radcliffe, a Directress of Music, and Miss Euzela Hamrick, teacher of Latin and History, are still with us and are most efficient and faithful teachers. Rev. T. C. Holland, A. B., Wake Forest College, and recently of the Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky., has charge of the Bible Department and is teacher of Greek. A report of this school would be incomplete that did not place special emphasis on the value to the school of Miss Etta L. Curtis, who is Lady Principal and teacher in the Intermediate Department, and who has personal charge of the girls' dormitory. A lady of culture and refinement, kind and sympathetic, rich in experience, firm in discipline, and prizing the cardinal virtues, your Board assures you that your daughters could not be in safer hands.

With equal confidence, your Board commends the boarding facilities of the school in which board is furnished at actual cost. This department is in charge of Miss Rosa Hirby, as Matron, who is a graduate of Indianapolis School of Domestic Science. She fully understands how to practice economy with the maximum of efficiency. This is demonstrated by the fact that good board for the first month of the present term was furnished at \$5.95 per student. She has been with the school for several years and not

a single complaint, as to board, has ever reached the Board from student or patron.

Principal's Report

The following recent report of the Principal to this Board clearly presents the present status of the school proper:

, "During the summer, Prof. O. P. Hamrick and I used all methods we knew for properly advertising the school and securing students. Our experience and observation has shown conclusively that the work of old students and friends and personal letters and work by the faculty are the most effective means for building your school. The results from newspaper advertisements have not been entirely satisfactory.

"The school has, at present, an enrollment of 209, the largest in its history at this season, there being 122 boys and 87 girls. These represent 15 counties in the two Carolinas and Georgia.

"Two students have been called home temporarily and two others are at home sick. The boarding club now numbers 132 besides teachers.

"The High School classes are organized, each having its officers, the purpose being to inspire a school spirit and to aid in developing to the highest degree practicable, a system of self-government.

"The various departments have enrollments as follows: Primary 25, Preparatory 53, Freshman 68, Sophomore 21, Junior 20, Senior 17, Music 23, Art 6, and Bible 46. There are 10 ministerial students and one missionary student.

"We are pleased to report that the management of the school, has so far, been very easy. We not only have an excellent student body but have the moral support of the public. The students seem to be busy and happy and are enjoying good health.

"The school is easily self-supporting financially, but, if the present financial situation, due to the influence of the war, does not improve, we fear what may follow.

"About one year ago, the Athenian and Rhamseuer Societies painted the interior of the Auditorium, and now the Kalligathians and the Kalliergeonians have presented the school with twenty-four nice chairs, a table, and a President's chair for the rostrum. Thus the boys and girls, in these four splendid societies, have the spirit of service and are doing things unselfishly for the advancement of your and their school.

"The Literary Societies have equipped each of the two society halls with a handsome piano."

Improvements

In addition to the improvements noted in the report of the Principal, we note the following during the past year: the roof of the Main Building has been re-painted, new seats have been added to the recitation rooms, numerous repairs have been made on the interior of the buildings, new furniture has been added to many of the rooms, and a new piano has been added to the Music Department. The grounds near the Main Building have been greatly improved by the flower gardens and grassy lawns planted and cared for by the students.

Needed Improvements

Your Board would be remiss in the performance of its duties were it fail to again urge upon you the need of the following improvements:

(1) A heating plant for the Main Building. (2) A complete system of Plumbing. (3) Furniture for the Auditorium and Recitation Rooms. (4) Painting of buildings both in and out. May God lead some of our good men and women to make some of the many improvements now needed by our beloved school or to provide for same in making their wills.

Indebtedness

It was the earnest hope and prayer of your Board that it would be able to report this year that the old indebtedness had all been paid, but in this it has been disappointed. After all funds in hand shall have been applied to the liquidation of the indebtedness, there will remain yet unpaid \$1,128.00. This indebtedness is represented by a balance on a note held by Brother L. S. Hamrick and by a note due the estate of the late L. A. Holland, both of which notes were signed by a majority of the Board as individuals. The administrator of L. A. Holland, deceased, recently brought an action against the members of the Board who signed the Holland note to determine the right of the school to a credit of \$60.00 on the note for a subscription made to the school by its intestate but which intestate failed to enter as a credit. Credit was allowed by the Court, but the note is now in the form of a judgment against the sixteen who are now and have been members of the Board. There yet remains unpaid in the form of notes and subscriptions that were taken in the fall of 1912, about \$700.00. The unpaid subscriptions vary in amounts from fifty cents to \$150.00 and are scattered over the territory of the two Associations. Owing to the accumulation of interest

since the close of the canvass in 1912, there would be some deficiency if all notes and subscriptions were paid, but we can not hope to collect all. To meet this deficiency, the Association should make some provision this term. The following were appointed by the Board one year ago to collect the unpaid pledges and are still acting in that capacity: W. A. Martin, G. B. Pruett, E. B. Hamrick, J. Y. Irvin and B. T. Falls.

The question has some time been asked, "What have the Trustees of the school themselves done?" In answer to this question will say that a recent inquiry has called forth the fact that the preset and the former members of the Board have contributed from the beginning of the work to date in the aggregate \$12,448.00.

You have a plant at Boiling Springs including lands, buildings, and equipment worth at a conservative estimate at least \$35,000.00.

Ministerial Education

Your Board heartily approves the action of the two Associations at their last sessions in appointing a joint Board on Ministerial Education for the benefit of this school. It is to be hoped that the latter Board will soon meet and organize for active work. Our school opens wide its doors to ministerial students. With few exceptions, they are a noble set of Christian young men, yet this Board thinks that the Ministerial Board should pass upon the merits of each case before assistance is given. It is to be earnestly hoped that both Associations will make ministerial education in this school one of the permanent objects of contribution. This is the only way we can make the school self-sustaining without charging ministerial students or making an unwise increase in tuition, either of which would be detrimental.

The last graduating class consisted of thirteen members, some of whom are now making their mark in college, some are teaching, while others are engaged in business purpits. We believe that they will all reflect honor on this instiution. In the line of a former precedent, this class presented the school, on commencement day, a large picture of our present Principal to be used in decorating the walls.

Trustees

The terms of the following members of this Board expire with this year, leaving vacancies to be filled as follows, viz: By the King's Mountain Association—J. D. Putnam, W. W. Washburn, E. C. Borders, G. F. Hambright and Rev. J. W. Suttle. Also a vacancy made by the resignation of S. H. Hamrick, who

has served one year on his term. By the Sandy Run Association: G. S. Hawkins, J. A. Calton, Rev. H. D. Harrill and Walter S. Lattimore. The best interest of our school demands that only those should be elected to this Board who are in position to and who are willing to attend the meetings of the Board regularly, if not providentially hindered. We regret to say that a large number of the present membership, though among the most loyal friends of the school, seldom attend the Board meetings. This places a responsibility on a few which the Association did not intend and which is inconsistent with the best interest of the school.

Opportunities For Christian Development

Knowing that the education that develops the intellectual to the neglect of the spiritual man is a failure, your Board and the Faculty of the school have striven to emphasize the importance of Christianity. We heartily commend the work being done in the Bible department by Rev. T. C. Holland who gives his entire time to the school and to the pastorate of the Boiling Springs Baptist Church. All students are required to attend Church and Sunday School each Sunday. The student body maintains a Y. M. C. A. and a Y. W. C. A. There is also a weekly prayer meeting and a B. Y. P. U. at the Church which all students have an opportunity to attend. The high moral character of the school is one of its distinguishing features.

Again, in conclusion, your Board desires to express its thanks and highest appreciation to the loyal friends of the school everywhere, who, at all times, have responded so nobly to every call for help. May you ever love, cherish and protect your school, and may God's richest blessings attend you.

ORPHANAGE REPORT

The care of the unfortunate is a natural and fundamental expression of Christianity. Jesus was in his ministry what he would have us be. He emphasized things fundamental and cast the program for all ages. He glorified childhood and so related his gospel to the physical wants of life that we cannot hope to save the soul unless we also provide for the body.

So far Orphanage work has been the principal form of our benevolence, largely because it has been showing the most tangible results. It has been said by some that it is necessary only to let the people know the needs of the Orphanage and they will be supplied. The coming year will show whether this is true or not. With only four hundred and thirty children we have fallen behind.

Children are already being received at the Kennedy Home. We now have fifty children there. The Miles Durham nursery for very small children, at Thomasville, will be completed before the winter months. If this is filled with children and we provide for those that are being received at the Kennedy Home, the current expenses must be increased \$10,000 over last year. It means that we must increase our contributions to this most worthy and needy cause at least 25 per cent. Will this association not go on record favoring this additional increase?

Among North Carolina Baptists nothing has so enlisted men

and women in the work of the kingdom as the Orphanage work. It has been the agency for the promotion of harmony, liberality and consecration. Thus in the larger work of the kingdom the little child is the leader.

Since the reception of the first child, Nov. 11, 1835, 1516 have been enrolled and the present number is 480 (with about 500 by end of the year). Average cost per child \$107.64 a year. The health record of the children for the past year has been remarkable, there being no deaths and few cases of serious illness.

Large and valuable additions are being made to the plant at Thomasville. A modern dairy barn has been completed. This department of our work along with the various other industrial features are to be emphasized. A splendid auditorium will be completed within a year. The erection of this important and greatly needed building was made possible by the bequest of the late Dr. S. W. Little of Davie County, whose honored name it will bear. Three new school rooms have been added with improvements on the old school building. A tenth grade has been put in the teacher course for the purpose of giving those who leave us a better preparation for life's struggles.

We would again urge and recommend: (1) That every Sunday School set aside one Sunday in each month as Orphanage day; (2) A club of Charity and Children in each Sunday school and an individual copy to pastors and all homes that are not represented in the Sunday school; (3) A liberal Thanksgiving offering emphasizing the importance of "Work Day," giving not less than one day's work to the Orphanage. We would suggest that in many churches it is best to select a Sunday nearest Thanksgiving day to hold this special service. This can be done to advantage on country fields.

Finally brethren let us constantly keep in mind the appeal of the Larger Orphanage and remember as we save the child we not only save the State but we save ourselves and in doing this we find our greatest happiness.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

Light never comes apart from responsibility. As we ourselves are made free by the divine truth, we must see that others at least have a chance to hear and know. We, as a denomination, have a chance to hear and know. We, as a denomination, have the Light and the Truth in a measure that other denominations can not claim. Realizing this, we know "To whomsoever much is given, of him much shall be required." As we know, so are we obligated to do. But how are we to do this work?

Missions are one, when Christ, our Savior died, he died once for All and for All people. And in his commission he said: "Begin first in Jerusalem." As a denomination we must follow the great commission beginning at Jerusalem, but by no means are we to stop with our own borders. To do that, were to disregard the Bible teaching, and to foster a narrow spirit. We are not to argue that so long as there are unsaved in our own state we should spend all our effort here in North Carolina. Suppose such had been the case in the past, we should have never heard of Christ, the Savior of men. In our every effort to advocate State Missions we only do as our Master did when he went first to "the lost sheep of the house of Israel," and later went out for the world.

The solution of all Mission work is found in what is known as "localization," since humanity is never saved in mass, but individual by individual, we do well to see that all have a chance to hear the "Good News." God has from the very first wonderfully blessed our State Mission enterprise. Thousands have been led to Christ, who might not have heard of Christ, but for the work of our State Board. Many of our strongest churches of today, were first mission stations, or at least received aid from our State Board. Our Board has worked well in the past, but we find no place to stop, yea the world at large calls for the continuance and enlargement of State Missions, which is our first work as a church in bringing the world to the Christ.

The need of the past was to know who to carry on the missionary enterprise in the face of poverty, but now we have to face great prosperity. Oh! that we might concentrate our wealth God's wealth, and ourselves to his service. Never in all our history has there been a greater need for our people to realize their religion in practical affairs. We are taught to be wise as serpents, and this wisdom will impell us to seek the salvation of our own State, for when a nation's religion wanes, the people go down in ruin. We in our State must stand up against many doctrines that are only meant to mislead. Some teach "Treat the child as

if he had never been out of the kingdom, and he will always look upon himself and act as a member of the kingdom." This would look beautiful, but for the fact "ye must be born anew." We as Baptists must still combat error as we proclaim the vital truth of "Repent, believe and be baptized." Our task this and it will not be finished until we have placed a Baptist minister and a Baptist church in every community within our borders.

If we are to do the best work in State Missions we should give during the entire year in a systematic way, and not wait until the close of the convention year to help in this work. To meet this need a resolution was adopted by the last state convention asking the churches to make an earnest effort to raise the amount due on State Missions in three installments.

If we would be better informed on our State Mission work your committee heartily recommends the works of our efficient Secretary, Livingston Johnson, on Christian Statesmanship and his History of State Missions.

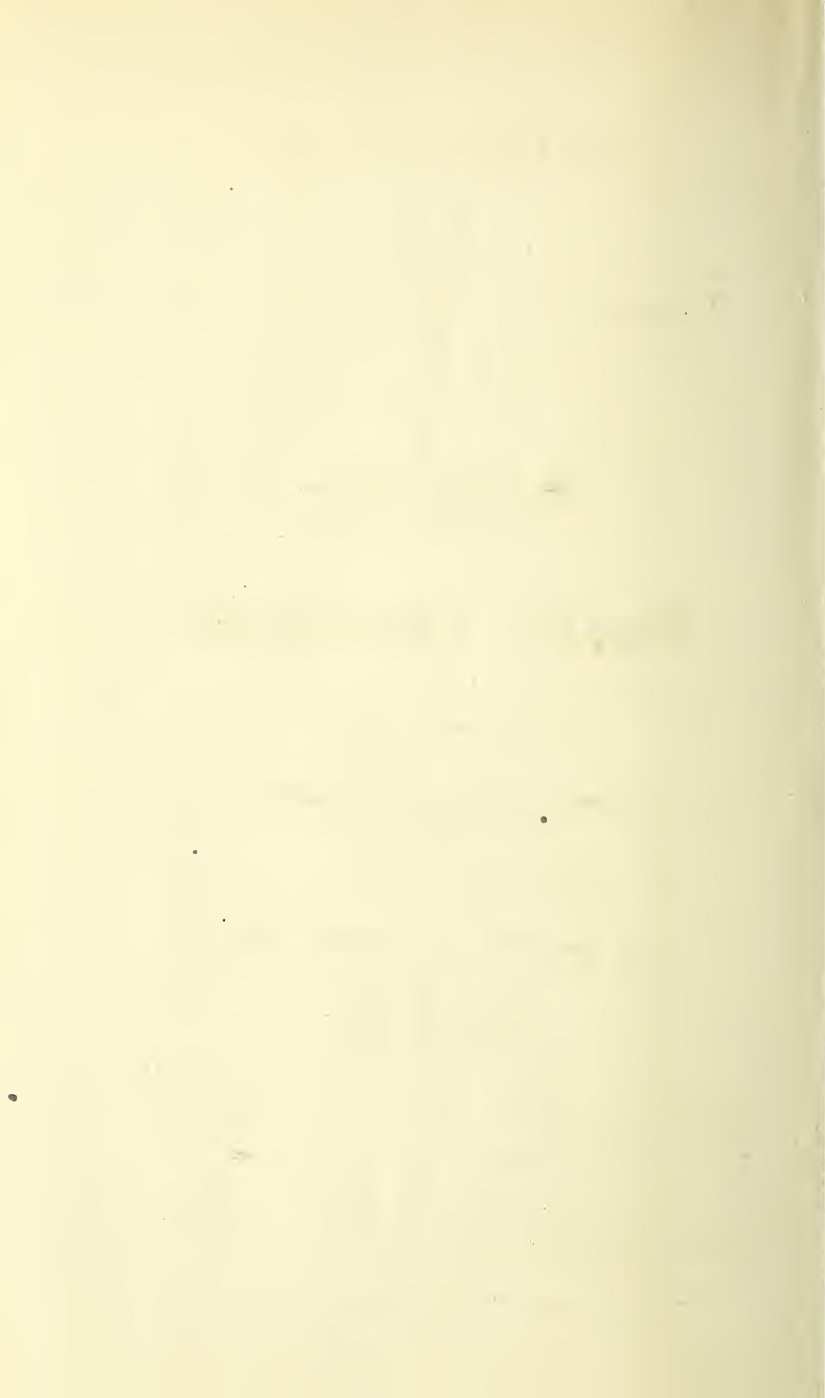

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE

Our Orphanage is the keystone in the arch of Christian service. If this stone is properly placed all the others in the arch will hold firm; if it is improperly placed the whole structure is in danger

Love for the Orphanage among our brethren is intense but not universal. The great need is to lay upon the heart of every church and Sunday school the Orphanage obligation. If this consummation is ever reached the problem for ample support for the institution will be solved.

Owing to the large advance that has been made within the past year the Orphanage is heavily in debt. This brings the unpleasant necessity of making a large outlay for interest or borrowed money, which goes to banks instead of to the children. This ought not so to be. We are abundantly able to pay every dollar the institution owes this year, and if able, we ought to be willing.

It is proposed to our people that the income of one day be sacredly set aside, at or near Thanksgiving day, and devoted to the Orphanage. If this would seize the hearts of our people, and every man, woman and child would enter heartily into this loving service, every dollar of debt would be wiped out, and the institu-

tion would be free from the bondage that now hampers its work and curtails its usefulness.

We earnestly urge every member of the churches of this Association to join this "work day" movement and give the proceeds of one day's labor or income to the Orphanage. We may do more but we should not do less.

Every Sunday school ought to set aside one Sunday in each month as Orphanage day and give the members an opportunity to make a contribution to the Orphanage. Only a little over one third of our Baptist Sunday schools are enrolled among this loyal band of monthly givers.

Every Sunday school ought to take a club of Charity & Children and an individual copy for pastors and homes that are not represented in the Sunday school. The paper is the right arm of the institution, and aside from the information and inspiration it furnishes, produces a good dividend for the support of the Orphanage.

During its thirty years of continued growth the institution has sheltered and trained over 1600 boys and girls, who are now out in the state as teachers, preachers, doctors, printers, farmers, business men and fathers and mothers of happy homes. There are 9 in various colleges and about a dozen in the denominational high schools. The present number is 500—450 at Thomasville, 50 at Kennedy Home—with an average cost of \$113.28 per child or 31 cents the day, aggregating an annual cost of \$56,640.00.

Our Orphanage has been enlarged and still the task looms before us as just begun. We urge every member of this Association that they regard the Orphanage in larger terms as an opportunity unparalleled. This waiting door stands too wide for "same as last year" contributions to ever satisfy any working body of Baptists.

Your committee recommend:

1. A liberal Thanksgiving offering emphasizing the importance of "WORK DAY," giving not less than one day's labor or income to the Orphanage.

2. That every Sunday school will sacredly set apart the collection of one Sunday in each month for the support of the Orphanage.

3. That every Sunday school take a club of Charity and Children.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board in Atlanta, Georgia, is the great central agency of the Southern Baptist Convention through which our people address themselves as a unit to the task of saving the South. This general agency at many points co-operates with and supplements the indispensable effort of the denomination in each State through State Missions. Our Home Board has the distinction of being by far the most successful Home Mission Board in America, when the number of souls won to Christ by its workers is taken as the standard of comparison. The Home Board reported 38,000 baptisms by its workers last year. The next largest number of baptisms reported by a Home Mission agency was 10,000 by the Home Mission Society of Northern Baptists. Of this large number of baptisms 17,000 were creditable to co-operating agencies, but 21,000 were creditable directly to Home Mission endeavor. The dollar given to Baptist Missions in the South reaches a larger harvest in souls than any other mission dollar spent in America.

The Home Board helps to maintain missionary pastors in co-operation with various state agencies; engages in work among the negroes; is undertaking a great work for Church Extension; conducts foreign mission schools and foreigner port and pastoral work; conducts a great system of mission schools for Highlanders; has instituted a most inspiring work of enlistment in co-operation with State agencies; has the most successful Evangelistic Department possessed by any domestic missionary agency in America; preaches the gospel to the Indians in Oklahoma; does a notably successful work in Cuba and Panama.

We earnestly commend to our churches the support of the great work of Home Missions. The intense appeal of secular interests and of pleasure in our modern industrial civilization, calls for an increased effort to turn and hold the faces and hearts of men toward the heavenly city. In all our churches we should carry the work of the Home Mission Board on our hearts in pray-

er to God and should give freely to the support of this great work.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Our foreign mission work is the effort on our part to carry out the last command of our Lord and Master to go into all the world and make disciples of all nations. The challenge of the hour to all our churches is the present call of our foreign mission work. The conditions of the world today are giving tremendous emphasis to the fact that all men need a simple New Testament religion. The non-Christian nations are awakening in a wonderful way and enquiring for the path of peace and the way of life. The doors are wide open. The people are more accessible than ever before. The harvest fields are ripe and we should now thrust in the sickle and reap on a scale that will far transcend anything in the past.

The Foreign Mission Board, located at Richmond, Virginia, composed of eighteen local members and eighteen state members representing each state in co-operation with the Southern Baptist Convention, is conducting work in Italy, Brazil Mexico, Argentina, China, Japan and Africa. In these fields the missionaries reported last year 382 churches with 819 out-stations, 33,584 church members, 442 Sunday Schools with 23,959 scholars and 8,833 students in mission schools, 384 of whom are in theological seminaries and training schools preparing to preach the gospel to their own people. There are 300 missionaries on the fields, 20 of whom were sent out during the past year, and a total of 651 workers. Notwithstanding difficult conditions on many of the fields caused by the European war and the injury to the work in Mexico from chaotic political conditions in that country, 5,190 baptisms were reported during the year.

The distressing financial conditions throughout the South created by the war in Europe caused a falling off in contributions to foreign missions last year. Many of the churches made heroic and sacrificial efforts but some of them were not able to keep up their usual contributions. This will make it more difficult for us to maintain the work this year unless God's people meet the situa-

tion in a still more heroic spirit. The Convention in Houston asked for an appropriation of \$624,000 for foreign missions this year. Every dollar of it will be needed to carry on the work successfully. Our supreme task now should be the raising of the apportionment as a minimum in every association and every state. We should not for a moment think of anything less and we must do more than this if possible.

We therefore recommend:

1. That we as an association undertake to raise for foreign missions our full proportion of the above sum; that each church inaugurate a plan of systematic weekly or monthly giving and remitting for this cause so that the work may be taken care of and debt and interest payments may be avoided.

2. That each pastor in the association appoint a Committee in each church of which he is pastor to canvass the membership with a view of securing a subscription to the Foreign Mission Journal in every Baptist family within our bounds, so that our people may be more fully informed as to our world-wide work.

REPORT ON EDUCATION

Brethren of the Sandy Run Association: We your committee beg to make the following report on Education.

One of the most vital questions we, as a denomination, are facing to-day is that of denominational and Christian Education.

An unenlightened and uneducated membership will retard the development of any organization and cause it to lag and go down in defeat.

Ignorance has been no little drawback in the past to the Baptist denomination of the South. But we have now come to a better time—a time that is demanding of us greater efficiency and a larger and broader usefulness. Conditions surrounding us are demanding a trained leadership.

Competition is compelling us to be more loyal and liberal to our denominational schools. As some one said not long since: "Secular Education is challenging the very existence and support of our colleges."

The fact can not be denied that the tendency of Education to-day is toward the secular, and unless we hasten we are not going to keep the denominational and Christian abreast with it.

It is an opportunity the church cannot afford to neglect. To keep under its authority and control the moral and intellectual training of its young men and young women. To do this we must make it possible for our denominational schools to offer to them the same advantage the State offers.

It is to those denominational institutions that the church must look almost entirely for its leadership in the future. It is estimated that about ninety-three per cent of preachers come from Christian schools. We need not look to the State institutions for leaders and preachers. If we are to have them educated we must do it ourselves. This being true, brethren, we believe it is the duty of the churches to make it possible for every preacher, called of God, to get an education. To do this we must furnish, as one puts it: "Both the institution and the means."

It is a fact that it is usually the poor boy who answers the call

to preach, and if he has to borrow money to the limit of his credit to get through school he will be so hampered and embarrassed when he gets through that his usefulness and service will be handicapped if not endangered.

Baptists have already in the U. S. twelve theological seminaries, one hundred universities and colleges and ninety-five academies which have an endowment of more than forty million dollars, and real estate and buildings of about the same value.

North Carolina Baptists have three colleges and fifteen secondary schools owned and controlled by the denomination. The property of these, including endowment, is valued at \$1,394,210. In these we have about two hundred officers and teachers, and about four thousand pupils. Besides these eighteen institutions there are six others under private control considered Baptist schools worth over \$150,000 with forty-five teachers and one thousand students.

Among the secondary schools mentioned above is our own Boiling Springs with an enrollment of over two hundred; eight capable and efficient teachers and valued at about \$40,000, which stands in the very front rank with the best of them. There are eleven ministerial students, who are depending on us for tuition. Wake Forest has nearly seventy, and the Seminary at Louisville has twenty-five from North Carolina.

We recommend that this Association endorse the new Educational program launched by the Convention in Raleigh, putting denominational education in our regular church budget, and that this Association pledge itself to raise the sum of \$300.00 to be paid during the current year to the Educational Board.

ANNUAL REPORT BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE BOILING
SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL

To the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Baptist Associations:

With profound gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His abundant blessings in the past, the Board of Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School hereby submits its eighth annual report.

Owing to the unsettled financial conditions that prevail

throughout the country at the beginning of the last scholastic year, your Board experienced great uneasiness as to the effect that it would have on our school but we are pleased to report that our fears were unfounded. The general progress that has been noted in former reports was still more marked along all lines last year. The sphere of usefulness of our school is rapidly widening; its popularity among friends of education everywhere is growing; and its future is radiant with hope. Year by year the churches of these two great Associations are becoming more loyal to their school—their own offspring—an institution that owes its life and vitality to them. True a few of these churches have not yet availed themselves of the opportunities here offered for training Christian workers, but these will soon be in line. Located in the midst of a predominantly Baptist country, with a faculty unsurpassed in qualification and experience, by any other secondary school in the State, with the latest equipment in all lines, your Board asserts,—without fear of contradiction, that this school stands without a peer in its field. No other agency is doing more for the growth and development of the Baptist denomination in particular and Christianity in general than the system of secondary schools and colleges controlled by the denomination. We heartily commend the Educational Board established by our Baptist State Convention last year which is headed by our beloved brother, Dr. R. T. Vann, who has done so much for the education of the womanhood of the State.

The total enrollment for year ending in April last was 234. The total cost of operating the school last year, including the boarding department, was \$10,349.35. The average cost of board last year was \$6.04 per month. The accounts yet due will cover all running expenses of last year.

Teachers

Your Board adheres to its well established rule to employ only teachers who are graduates of reputable colleges. It means more expense but it gives tone and efficiency to the school that nothing else will.

Only three changes were made in the faculty for the present term. Miss Ethel Wofford, A. B., of Limestone College, succeeds Miss Nell Sholar in the Primary Department and Miss Pat Walser, B. M., Peace Institute and Peabody Conservatory of Music, Cincinnati, Ohio, succeeds Miss Margaret C. Radcliffe as Director of Music Department. Mrs. Lillian M. Ritch, formerly of Woman's College, Columbia, S. C., succeeds Miss Rosa Kirby as Matron and Inspector of Boys' Dormitory. These have proven them-

selves to be most worthy additions to our faculty. We are fortunate in retaining the following who have so faithfully and successfully served us in the past: Prof. J. D. Huggins, Principal; Miss Etta Curtis, Lady Principal; Prof. O. P. Hamrick, Bursar and Department of English; Mrs. J. D. Huggins, Department of History; Rev. T. C. Holland, Bible Department; Miss Euzelia Hamrick, Department of Latin; and Miss Euphemia Watson, Department of Art.

Our new Matron fully understands how to practice economy with the maximum of efficiency. This is fully demonstrated by the fact that she furnished good board the first month of the present term at a total cost of \$5.90 per student, including salary of Matron, cooks, and helpers.

Early in the recent vacation, our popular and efficient principal, Prof. J. D. Huggins, became critically ill from the recurrence of an old affliction and was forced to spend several weeks in a Hospital and to have his right leg amputated above the knee. We are happy to report that he has so far recovered that has resumed school duties. His affliction prevented his doing his usual amount of traveling for the School during vacation, but through the faculty, our territory was largely covered and as a result of this, and the assistance from other sources, a large attendance is reported.

Improvements

Through the untiring and persistent efforts of our popular and layol Lady Principal, Miss Etta Curtis, assisted by other friends of the school, two much-needed modern improvements are being installed in the Main Building. The first is a complete system of Water Works with a 1500 gallon iron compressed air tank and with a large concrete septic tank more than 300 feet from the rear of building. The funds for this improvement were obtained by popular subscriptions. The total cost of this plant will approximate \$900.00 and there is a deficiency of about \$300.00 in the hands of Miss Curtis for this purpose. Your Board, as such, has assumed no part of the cost of this improvement.

The second improvement is a Steam Heating Plant for the Main Buliding which is nearing completion and will cost \$2,224.00. The Gastonia Plumbing and Heating Company has the contract. The funds for this purpose were furinshed by the following faithful friends of the school: E. B. Hamrick, Dr. J. W. Wood, S. B. Turner, Wiley Hamrick, Carme Elam, O. P. Hamrick, and Geo. P. Glenn. Your Board made the following contract with these gentlemen: The title to the Heating Plant shall vest in them till such

time as the Board shall be able to and shall elect to buy the plant at actual first cost. The Board is to operate the plant, keep it in repair, and keep it insured all at its own expense. The Board is to collect rental for the heat furnished and to pay the investors an annual dividend of 8 per cent. The Board hopes, by the saving in cost of operation of present plant over old system of heating, to accumulate a sinking fund with which to buy in the Heating Plant within a few years. Plans are also on foot by which your Board hopes to install a Heating Plant in the Boy's Dormitory also before cold weather. The plans in view are similar to those hereinabove stated for the Main Building.

The walls of the interior of the Main Building have recently been treated to a new coat of calamine.

Needed Improvements

Your Board again calls your attention to the following much-needed improvements: (1) Painting of buildings interior and exterior. (2) Additional furniture for Recitation Rooms and Auditorium. (3) Additional books and periodicals for library and reading room. (4) As early as possible, an enlargement of the Boys' Dormitory.

May we not hope that God will put it in the hearts of some of our good people, as individuals, to make some of these and other improvements that will be needed from time to time or to provide for same in their wills?

Old Indebtedness

At the request of this Board, the two Associations last year secured additional subscriptions that were thought ample, with the unpaid part of the subscriptions taken in the great canvass of 1912, to liquidate in full the old building indebtedness against our school. Owing to financial condition that prevailed in our territory last fall and winter, a large part of the subscriptions have not yet been paid. It is the hope of the Board that these subscriptions, with interest thereon to date, will be paid this fall. If so, all will be well. The remainder of this indebtedness is being carried by one of the loyal members of our Board, Bro. L. S. Hamrick. It is hoped that the brethren will reward his kindness by an early payment of their subscriptions.

Your plant at Boiling Springs, including lands, buildings, and equipment, is worth approximately \$40,000.

Ministerial Education

Your school opens wide its doors to ministerial students who are required to pay no tuition. They are a noble set of Christian young men who have a healthy influence over other young men. It is to be hoped that both Associations will ever make ministerial education in this school one of the regular objects of contribution, as this is the only way that the School can be made self-sustaining without placing our rates for tuition too high. We heartily commend the noble act of Rev. Wade D. Bostic, Missionary to China, who, some two years ago, began contributing \$30.00 a year for a period of four years to Ministerial Education in this school in return for free tuition given him while at Wake Forest. It is his desire that the ministerial students that go out from us, when they get into the active ministry, follow his example.

Graduates

--

The last graduating class contained eighteen members, the largest in the history of the school. The first class contained only six. The six classes so far sent out aggregated sixty-eight, while several hundred others here laid foundations broad and deep for useful manhood and womanhood. We point with pride to the high standard made by our students in the leading colleges and universities of the country and to their success in all lines of endeavor.

Trustees

The terms of the following members of this Board expire this year, leaving vacancies to be filled as follows, to-wit: Kings Mountain Association—T. P. Hamrick, B. T. Falls, J. H. Quinn, G. H. Logan, and J. Y. Irvin. Sandy Run Association—J. J. Edwards, D. M. Harrill, W. A. Martin, G. B. Pruett, and Rev. J. G. Graham. We are pleased to report that the attendance of the members upon our meetings this year have been better than usual.

Insurance of Property

The Insurance on our property will expire November 27th. We are now carrying \$12,000 but the Board advises an increase of \$2,000, at least, on account of recent improvements. We can save one year's premium by insuring for three years. The maximum premium on \$14,000 for three years will be \$308.00, but we are making an effort to have some reduction made in rates on account of improvements made. Your Board has found it impossible, so

far, to provide for this item of expense from the income of the school and must, therefore, ask the Association at this term to provide for this item.

Principal's Report

The following extract from the Principal's latest report to this Board presents the present status of the school:

"It is my privilege to inform you that your school is, at present, in splendid condition. The health of the student body is extremely good. Never before has the student body, as a whole, shown a greater tendency to respect the regulation and to apply themselves better to their studies.

"The present large enrollment is a splendid compliment from the public to last year's success as well as to the splendid work done this summer.

"The outlook is that we shall this year equal or surpass the enrollment of other years. If we satisfy the public this year, our future is bright indeed.

"The total enrollment to date this term is as follows: Boys 107, and girls 98, making a total of 205. These are classified as follows Preparatory 42, Freshmen 77, Sophomores 37, Juniors 22, and Seniors 27. There are 25 Music Students, 8 Art Students, and 11 Ministerial Students.

"In our student body are represented 60 churches, 3 States—North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia, and a total of 19 counties in these three States, against 15 counties last year. While our attendance from North Carolina is much larger than from South Carolina, we have the same number of counties (9) represented from the latter that we have from the former.

"To determine the influence that bring students to us, we have made inquiry of 51 new students with the following result: 10 were influenced to come to us by pastors, 20 by old students, 19 by teachers canvassing, and 2 by advertising."

Ministerial Co-Operation

The Board, appreciating the power for good exercised by the ministry, specifically appointed each minister in the two Associations as an agent for the school to represent its interest at all times and placed in the hands of each a copy of our latest catalogue that he may be able to impart any knowledge necessary relative to the school. Already the fruits of their influence can plainly be seen in increased attendance. May their influence ever continue to grow!

Christian Development

The supreme importance of Christianity in the intellectual development of the youth has ever been stressed by your school. Special emphasis is placed on the Bible Department which is in charge of Rev. T. C. Holland, pastor of the Boiling Springs Baptist Church. This department made great progress during the last year. All students are required to attend church and Sunday School each Sunday. The Student body maintains a Y. M. C. A. and a Y. W. C. A. There is also a weekly prayer meeting and a B. Y. P. U. at the church which all students have an opportunity to attend. School opens with devotional exercises each morning and all students are required to attend.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

The Kingdom of God in the temperance field is gradually increasing. Temperance lovers are now the popular folk. The seekers of political honors are now not afraid to stand against the cause of whiskey. An advocate of whiskey could not hope to be elected in North Carolina, as well as in many other states. Formerly we dreamed of Statewide prohibition, but long since we have decided to have nation-wide prohibition. In 1906 there were only three prohibition states. Today we have seventeen such states. In addition to this there is much dry territory in partly wet states, so that now one half of the people of the United States live in dry territory.

The four leading nations of Europe in the present war, namely, Germany, Russia, France and England have given a powerful impulse to this prohibition work in our own country. In Russia no intoxicants shall be manufactured and sold. These nations, as well as industrial enterprises, are putting a premium on work done by sober people.

To go through some of our large cities, it seems that we have a mighty task before us in banishing whiskey from our borders, but He that is with us is more powerful than the evil one, who is responsible for this great curse. In our work, we must do all we can single-handed, trying to save our fellows, but in many things we must co-operate and in these ways we are going to rid our nation of its greatest curse.

We recommend to this Association that you consider soft-drinks and cigarettes as a curse second only to whiskey and that our preachers and teachers denounce these practices along with whiskey.

And second we recommend that every church member shall feel it his duty to inform against any person that violates our laws, and sells whiskey in our immediate communities.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

In his last instructions to his disciples Christ said, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me, both in Jerusalem and in all Judea, in Samaria and to the uttermost part of the earth."

This includes all departments of our mission work, State, Home and Foreign. North Carolina is our Judea and this command of our Lord requires us to witness for Him here.

The figures for last year show 151 missionaries who preached at 279 points. They report 2726 professions of faith, 2469 baptisms, and 1836 added by letter. The mission churches contributed last year \$29,043.46. This did not include what they paid for the support of their pastors, or money spent for building houses of worship, but it is the amount raised for the objects of the Convention. In other words, the mission fields gave back to the denomination last year, sixty per cent of all that the Baptists contributed to State Missions. If we add to these figures the amount the mission fields paid toward the support of their pastors and for building houses of worship, we shall have considerably more than the total amount spent in State Mission work last year.

Now as to the future: Our state is making marvelous pro-

gress in material things. The value of farm products has increased from \$53,214,000, in 1900, to \$200,533,640 in 1913. The value of farm property, including lands and buildings, more than doubled between the years 1900 and 1910.

There is a greater industrial awakening in North Carolina, perhaps, than in any other state in the South. North Carolina is at the very heart of the hydro-electric development in the state. The Piedmont section of the state is being rapidly transformed, and manufacturing industries are destined to multiply rapidly, as electric-power becomes more plentiful. As to the future of North Carolina materially, it is hard to over-paint the picture.

But what of the religious condition of the state? We have a population now of, perhaps, 2,500,000. Of these 900,000 are Christians. Some of these, it is true, have not reached the years of accountability; but it is a conservative estimate to say that half of the adult population of the state are not professing Christians.

There are twenty counties in the East in which there is great destitution. In the state as a whole one white person out of every six is a member of a Baptist church; while in the twenty counties to which reference has been made only one out of thirty-eight is a Baptist.

We must remember, also, that the stream of immigration flowing into the South, is destined to become larger each year, and North Carolina may expect its full share.

These two things, the rapid development of our state and the increasing destiny of our population, call loudly for aggressive State Mission work. Because of our vast numbers we Baptists are more responsible for the future of our state religiously than any other denomination. Indeed, the responsibility upon us is almost as great as it is upon all the other denominations combined.

Report on Sunday School

The Sunday school work is an important work for the up-building of the church as well as the community. It is in harmony with the life and teaching of Christ, therefore should not be neglected by His followers. In the state there are more than 2000 Baptist churches, not all of these churches have Sunday schools, but with the branch school they number more than the churches—a mighty host of people all studying the same scriptures at the same time and if rightly engaged in is a great power for the bringing in of the kingdom. We find that a large percent of our church members do not attend Sunday school at all—this should not be. All the churches in this association reported Sunday schools last year except one; and twenty eight of the thirty seven schools were kept open twelve months. We find only about one-fifth of the enrollment in our Sunday schools are church members—this should not be. Our great task is to get more of our church members in Sunday school. Contributions grow in the Sunday schools—in 1914 reports show \$1,390.31; in 1915, \$1,633.16, a gain of \$243.16. We urge all pastors and Sunday school workers to make an earnest effort to enlist more of our church members in the great work of Sunday school and this will be a great power in the work of the kingdom, and will bring more into the treasury of the Lord.

Report on State Missions

Since the last meeting of this body Dr. Livingstone Johnson, the beloved and honored secretary of State Missions, has given up

his position and Rev. Walter N. Johnson has been elected to succeed him, and he has entered upon his duties with all the energy and enthusiasm of his intense personal nature. As we stood by his predecessor, so we shall stand by the new secretary and assure him of our hearty co-operation and support.

No greater subject can come before this body than State Missions. It is primal, foundation work. Upon its success depends all other work of the kingdom. We must take care of our own, and strengthen our stakes and lengthen our lines, and lay deep and broad the foundations at home that we may be better prepared to help Home and Foreign Missions and every other interest of the kingdom. North Carolina is one of the great states of the union. She is growing rapidly in population. Her industries and material wealth are multiplying by leaps and bounds. Her schools and colleges are crowded with students. Her beautiful mountain section is coming more and more into prominence, and is rapidly filling up with a population drawn there by the beautiful scenery and salubrious climate. It is the task of State Missions to keep pace with this progress and development; evangelize and baptize the people, and form them into churches, and develop them in all the gifts and graces of the Christian religion. The Baptist churches of the state are asked to raise \$55,000 for the work this year. Up to this time we have fallen very far behind. More than half of this amount is yet to be raised if we go up to the convention without a debt—and to report a debt would be nothing short of a calamity. Let us bestir ourselves and see to it that the churches of the Sandy Run do their full part in raising the \$55,000 asked for State Missions.

Report on the Biblical Recorder

Your committee submits the following: It has been 83 years since the Recorder was first founded. No religious paper has ever given more general satisfaction than the Recorder to the Baptist of North Carolina. We cannot do without it. How would we know what has been done and what is doing now if it was not for the Biblical Recorder? It helps us to know what the Baptist of the State are doing financially. Also our strength numerically. It has been true to the Bible and the cause of Christ. It ever has been a strong advocate of missions—state, home and foreign; a true and loyal friend to the Baptist orphanage. Every Baptist family ought to take the Recorder. Only about 10,000 Baptist families take it; 75,000 do not read it. If we do not read the Recorder we are far behind in knowing the workings of the Baptist throughout the state. The stockholders and managers of the Recorder are forced to put the price at two dollars. The cost of material is much higher than it has been. No religious State paper is under two dollars anywhere. We had better pay \$2 than do without it.

Report on Education.

We your committee beg leave to submit the following report

on education. This in many respects seems to be an unusual year. There are many apparent hinderances for our schools, but all of these are not able to keep our young people out of school. Both our High schools and colleges are filled almost to the point of overflowing. For all of this we are indeed glad.

As good as this year is, be it known we are doing no more than our duty in regard to filling our institution with our children. If we expect our schools to run, we must see to it, that it is possible.

For higher training Wake Forest and Meredith stand unsurpassed by any institutions in the south. But we are more especially interested in the Boiling Springs High School which we own and control. We are under many obligations to this school, and let us as brethren stand by it, and give it a chance to do its best.

None doubt the advanges accruing from education since in the beginning God said let there be light, and light was good. In Romans 10:2 we find our zeal of God should be seasoned with knowledge. In Hosea 4:6, the people perish for the want of knowledge. Of all the kinds of training your committee can recommend is found under Christian influence, from the free schools on through with a university training. The primary teacher ought to be a Christian first and a teacher second and after this school is completed the Bible ought to be required as a text book as long as a person is a student in our denominational schools.

Under the present outlook your committee heartily commends the work that is now being done.

Report on Orphanage

The care of the unfortunate is a fundamental expression of Christianity. Jesus glorified childhood and so related His gospel to the physical wants of life that we cannot hope to save the soul unless we also provide for the body.

About 1882 or '83 the Lord began to impress upon the hearts of some of our brethren the necessity of a place to care for the unfortunate children and they began to pray and plan and on November the 11th, 1885 the first child was received in the orphanage and since that time there have been 1702 children enrolled; these have been cared for, schooled and trained and sent out into the world to follow the several vocations of life and we are glad to say that in nearly all instances they are making good.

We have at present 500 children at Thomasville, the cost of maintenance is about \$110,00 per child. Not including building and repairing.

We have at the Kennedy Home fifty children during the lifetime of Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy, the orphanage has to pay a rental of \$2,000 yearly for the farm, and net profit last year after paying off the rent was \$897.25.

The most urgent need of the Kennedy Home is a suitable chapel for religious service. The high cost of living and material for building and repairing makes it necessary that we increase our gifts to the orphanage and your committee recommends the one day income for the orphanage on or near Thanksgiving day and also that every Sunday school set aside at least one collection each month for the orphanage. And that every Sunday school

take a club of Charity and Children.

Finally brethren let us keep in mind the need of a greater orphanage as we are informed that there are upon an average 50 applications per month, mostly turned away, let us remember as we save the child we save the life which is not only a blessing to them, but to us also.

ANNUAL REPORT TRUSTEES BOILING SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL

To the King's Mountain and Sandy Run Baptist Associations:—

In submitting this our ninth annual report of the Boiling Springs High School, we desire to express our profound gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His guidance and numberless blessings during these twelve eventful years since the first steps were taken in connection with the building of this school—years have meant so much for the cause of Christian education in this territory.

All things considered, the past year has been the most successful in the history of your school. Year by year it grows in the estimation of the public and its area of patronage continues to widen. Still a number of churches in these two Associations are not represented in its student body, but we do not believe this condition will long exist. These churches can not afford to miss the strengthening influence of this school on the young membership of the churches. The total enrollment last year was 259, which was an increase of 25 over the previous year.

The last graduating class numbered 20, five of them being young men and fifteen young ladies, the largest class in the history of the school. Since the establishment of the school, 88 have grad-

uated while hundreds of others have laid foundations broad and deep for useful manhood and womanhood. Many of our graduates have since graduated from the best colleges and universities of the land and stand in their respective fields of endeavor, two of them now being teachers in our school.

The total cost of operating the school last year, including the boarding department, was \$11,354.75. If all accounts now due for last year are collected there will be a small surplus, after paying all expenses, to be applied to much needed permanent improvements.

Teachers

Adhering to the long-established rule of employing only college graduates as teachers, your board is pleased to report the retention of all last year's teachers. All have proven themselves to be eminently fitted for their respective positions. To meet the urgent and growing need of such a school, your Board found it necessary to add two new departments to the school at the beginning of the present term, to-wit: Domestic Science with Miss Jessie T. Pangle, a graduate of Carson-Newman College, of Johnson City, Tenn, as teacher; and a Commercial Department, with Mr. Yates Blanton, a graduate of Cecil Business College, as teacher. Miss Pangle also has charge of the Art Department.

The following constitute the faculty for the present term with the work assigned each, to-wit: J. D. Huggins, principal, Mathematics and Science; Miss Etta Curtis, lady principal, Intermediate Department; Miss Euphemia Watson, Intermediate Department; O. Paul Hamrick, Bursar, Department of English; Miss Euzelia Hamrick, Latin and History; Rev. T. C. Holland, Bible Department; Miss Patsy A. Walser, Director of Music; Miss Jessie T. Pangle, Art and Domestic Science; Miss Ethel Wofford, Primary Department; Yates Blanton, Commercial Department; and Mrs. Lillian M. Ritch, Matron and Inspector of Boys' Dormitory. The marked efficiency of Mrs. Ritch as Matron is clearly demonstrated by the fact that she furnished good board the first month of the present term at \$6.20 per student, notwithstanding the high price of living.

Improvements

In addition to the steam heating plant in main building as reported last year, a separate and distinct plant of same kind was installed in the Boys' Dormitory and the Moore Cottage last fall at a cost of \$775.00. Messrs E. B. Hamrick, Wylie Hamrick, O. Paul Hamrick and George P. Glenn furnished the money for the installation of this plant and hold the title thereto till such time as the trustees will be able to buy it in. A reasonable charge is made for heat and out of this income a dividend of 8 per cent is paid the above gentlemen. It is hoped that a surplus can be accumulated from this source with which to purchase the plant in a few years.

The system of water works which was in course of construction at time of our last annual report is now completed, works perfectly, is paid for, lacking only \$50, and cost \$1,045.91. We owe this most valuable improvement to the faithful and persistent efforts of our very highly appreciated lady principal, Miss Etta Curtis.

The addition of two new departments to the school necessitated additional recitation rooms. Not having space in the main building for these, the old church building has been converted into three attractive class rooms at a total cost of approximately \$175.00. These rooms are occupied by the Primary, Art and Domestic Science Departments. These rooms have been furnished at a cost of about \$150.00. The total value of your plant is now approximately \$45,000.

The church and the school are taking steps to beautify the grove and grounds in front of the main building under the supervision of a landscape architect. This will add materially to the beauty of the park.

Needed Improvements

For the preservation of the buildings as well as improvement in their appearance, the buildings should be painted at once both inside and out. To longer delay will mean deterioration. Additional furniture is greatly needed in the auditorium and recitation rooms. It is impossible for your board to meet these requirements from the income from tuition without making our rates too high to successfully compete with other schools of like grade.

It is to be hoped that, at no distant date, some way will be found by which an additional building may be erected as it is so much needed. This building should contain a large auditorium, society halls, music rooms, a library, etc. This would leave additional space in main building for recitation rooms or dormitory space. It would be so appropriate if this building could be known as the Dobbins-Dixon Memorial Building in honor of the two pioneer Baptist preachers, Revs. Drury Dobbins and Thomas Dixon, who did so much for the Baptist denomination in all this section. Let us hope that God will put it into the hearts of some of our noble men and women to provide means for this building.

Old Indebtedness

To us this subject is painful. Your board has twice announced to the Associations that a sufficient sum had been subscribed to liquidate the old indebtedness. We promised you that we would never call on you again for this purpose, but conditions are such that we feel it our duty to place the facts before you and to ask you to take such course as you think proper. At the 1914 sessions of the Associations we stated that we hoped to collect as much as \$875.00 to be paid within one year with interest from date and with the sum then available we hoped to wipe out all of the old indebtedness. You made the subscriptions and if all had paid we would now be out of debt, but, alas! much of the amount subscribed at the sessions named is still due. We are still in debt, principal and interest, about \$1000.00. Against this we have subscriptions due aggregating about \$1600, same being balance due from various campaigns for funds. Of this sum \$435.00 are due on the 1914 subscriptions made by the churches and members at associations. In other words, a little more than half the sum subscribed at that time has been paid. We should explain, however, that \$175.00 of the above balance was made with the understanding that same should be paid when the remaining money is in hand to pay the debt. One other subscription for \$250 made in 1912 was on like condition. Your board has made many urgent but fruitless efforts to collect the back subscriptions. What shall

we do? In view of the fact that the present and former trustees have paid more than half the money collected for our school, we cannot think the Associations desire or will permit the trustees to pay this deficit. The case is with you.

Ministerial Education

Like other institutions of this kind, we always admit ministerial students free of tuition. As a rule, they are an exemplary set of young men and exercise a most wholesome influence over the student body. As the school has no source of income other than tuition and must provide instruction for the ministerial students, we are forced to look to the Associations for a sum sufficient to cover their tuition. It is hoped that the Association will make some permanent arrangement for meeting this need.

Trustees

The terms of the following members of this Board expire this year by limitation, leaving vacancies to be filled as follows, to-wit: King's Mountain Association—L. S. Hamrick, J. F. Moore, Carme Elam, N. B. Hamrick, and E. B. Hamrick, Sandy Run Association—T. M. Holland, G. S. Hawkins, P. R. Green, M. M. Green, and A. L. Jolley. The removal of Rev. J. R. Miller from the King's Mountain Association leaves a vacancy to fill by that body; this term will expire in 1917.

Principal's Report

The following extract from the recent report of the Principal to this Board presents the present status of your school:

"It gives me pleasure to inform you that your school is in a flourishing condition. The health of the school is most excellent and the students more than ordinarily zealous.

"We felt that last year's large enrollment was evidence of the approval by the public of the policies of the School. If so, then we have added evidence of the confidence of the people as the enrollment to date for the present term has surpassed that of last year. The total enrollment to date is as follows: Boys, 137, and girls 81, making a total of 318. These are classified as follows: Primary 26, Fifth and Sixth Grades 15, Preparatory 48, Freshman 58, Sophomore 35, Junior 26, and Senior 22. There are enrolled in special classes as follows: Music 21, Art 3, Domestic Science 11, Commercial 10, Typewriting 20, and Bible Class 34. There are at present 7 Ministerial students and one Missionary student. There are 73 day students and 145 boarding students. 40 Churches of the two Associations are represented and there are 13 counties and three States—North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia. There are 26 students from South Carolina and two from Georgia.

"Above the primary grades there are 151 Baptists, 11 Methodists, 4 Presbyterians, and 20 non-communicants.

"Of the influences bringing students to the school, we find them, in order of their importance, the following: old students, teachers, trustees, and advertising."

Ministerial Co-Operation.

Temperance.

It is a lamentable fact that there is of necessity in the order of business in nearly all of our ecclesiastical bodies, the topic of Temperance. When we speak of temperance it does not mean what it meant 20 years ago. Then we labored to convince the people that whiskey was an evil, now we persuade men to give up this evil habit. We do not hope to abolish this monster by evangelizing those who drink it because drunkards are being made faster than we are evangelizing the people. Whiskey is an outlaw and not a respectable gentleman and should be treated as an outlaw by every good citizen.

The temperance movement involves moral, social and economic issues. Religious bodies, industrial corporations, medical associations, and national armies are rising up against this outlaw.

We are attempting to overthrow this outlaw by teaching the evil effects of alcohol and narcotics, in the home, in the day school in the Sunday school, and from the pulpit. This work has been helpful. It has made a marked change in the minds of the people in regard to temperance. There is an increase in dry territory, nineteen states now have constitutional prohibition and the states of California, Montana and South Dakota will vote on the constitutional amendment soon. Another hopeful sign is the decrease in the output. And still another hopeful sign is, the people are beginning to regard temperance a national issue and are asking for

national prohibition. We may help the cause along by: (1). Information and right ideals on the part of the people. (2). Honest and capable men as lawmakers. (3). A competent, courageous executive. In order to set the people right, then they will choose the right officers.. We should elect men to the offices whom we know to be sober, honest, upright, and capable. Vote for no man you do not know to be true and spare no pains to find out the kind of man you vote for.

We may help the cause of temperance by giving our support to the Anti-Saloon League, by helping to enforce the law at our door, by passing an amendment for national prohibition, by teaching the destructive influences of soft drinks and cigarettes, and by disciplining intemperate church members.

Report on Home Missions.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention located in Atlanta, Ga., has 71 years been the agent of our united Southern Baptist body for saving our own land.

As an evangelizing agency it outstrips and surpasses all other home mission boards in America, although many of these are great and successful. The story of the achievements of its missionaries in bringing lost souls to Christ is nothing short of marvelous.

Measured by baptism the work of our board this year shows results 5,000 ahead of the remarkable results of a year ago. The total number of baptisms reported by its workers is 43,792, with the total, brought into the churches 71,386. A minority of the above however, should be credited to agencies cooperating with the H. M. B. During the last 15 years southern Baptists have increased in numbers sixty one per cent. The increase in baptisms in 1915 was 105 per cent over the increase in 1900. Our mission contributions in 1915 were 35 per cent over these for 1911, and are total gifts to all objects 333 per cent increase. From 1900 to 1916 baptisms of the H. B. have increased 646 per cent. The board has its work divided into several departments, as follows: Co-operative mission work. The work in Cuba, the Canal Zone, mountain schools, evangelism and the publicity department. It also includes the work of English and work among the negroes Indian and foreigners. The past year has shown a notable advance along almost every line.

The description work for the H. B. and every phase of its work from the beginning has been growth—as Dr. Gray Smith put it: “It has become a habit with us.”

For the first time in years, our board was compelled to report at the last convention, which met in Asheville a debt of \$72,000 which necessitates retrenchment along some lines for this year. The great big burning question up to us now is: Are we going to redeem the situation. God has been and is favoring the people of the south by giving us the highest price for our cotton, corn and other products than has been known for decades. Are we going to use these blessings selfishly or are we going to come to the “help of the Lord” in this church and kingdom crisis? “Grand and awful” are these times in which we are living—grand from the

standpoint of opportunity and awful from the standpoint of responsibility. The H. M. B. is the great unifying, constructive interstate agency, of southern Baptists and has been the main force in making the Baptists of the south the great, splendid and powerful people they are—with a oneness of that and purpose that you find in no other religious denomination. Are we going or rally to its former in this time of stress or are we going to act the part of the weakling, the deserter, the retrencher and traitor to this organization which lies at the very heart and center of all our mission work.

We recommend: (1) That our churches and people be urged to order and make use of the boards free books. This will mean enlightenment on the work. (2) That every church member be encouraged to take our magazine on missions. (3) That every church be urged to pay its full apportionment to home missions. (4) That this association adopt as its part of the expense of this great work \$800.

Report on Foreign Missions.

The Foreign Mission board of the Southern Baptist convention, located at Richmond, Virginia, in its last report tells of a year of triumphant success both at home and abroad. The total contributions for the year, including the amount raised on the debt and on the Judson centennial fund, were \$806,729. The only drawback on the year's work was the fact that the contributions for the current support amounting to \$518,323, left a deficit which, combined with the old debt, made a total indebtedness of \$180,00. During the meeting of the convention in Asheville a great movement was started for the purpose of paying off this heavy indebtedness, and

many of our brethren and sisters have made beautiful and joyful responses to this appeal.

The campaign to raise the Judson centennial fund of \$1,250,000 has been successful. There is need that our pastors encourage the prompt collection of the subscriptions to this fund.

During the year there have been 6,471 converts baptized and 77 churches instituted. Our foreign missionaries now number 315, of whom 133 are men and 182 women. The membership of our mission churches is now 42,632 organized into 459 churches, 95 of which are self-supporting. The native Christians contributed \$129,651 to the work in their midst. We have 426 Sunday schools which report 10,490 scholars. There are 453 mission schools with 13,531 students. Of these mission schools six are Women's Bible Training Schools, with 200 students, and 10 are Theological Training Schools, with 191 students. We have now 19 medical missionaries, 9 hospitals and 10 dispensaries. Our medical missionaries treated 74,866 patients last year.

Attention should be called to the great strides which the native churches are taking toward self-support, self-government and self-propagation. One field will serve to illustrate this. In Brazil the per capita gifts for all objects is \$5.72. Our Brazilian Baptists have their own home and foreign mission boards. Amongst our members in foreign lands there are many tithers. There are indeed churches which make tithing a test of fellowship. Many churches in the foreign fields are building their own houses of worship, paying the salaries of their pastors and contributing to the support of missionary work in their own lands and elsewhere. Native workers are being trained, and as we look into the near and far future the outlook is indeed bright.

Like everything that grows, our Foreign mission work has increasing necessities. Our success has carried us into a situation from which there is not turning back and which lays new claims upon us. We have tasks which we can neither turn loose nor turn over to others. To turn loose means to ignore opportunities, forsake converts and churches or turn them over to other denominations. We ought not to do either. Perhaps there is nothing connected with foreign missions so imperfectly understood by the masses of our people as this of the unescapable necessities of the work. Conditions at home may be pierced out by other means, and in emergencies matters can be deferred for the time being, but such is not the case on the foreign fields where foreign missionary salaries and other items have to be met.

We would urge that our churches make use of the many free tracts which can be secured from the foreign mission board.

The convention at Asheville ordered the consolidation of the Foreign Mission Journal and the Home Field into one magazine to be published by the Sunday School board at Nashville. This consolidated magazine will still be the organ through which the board and its missionaries will be able to speak most effectively to the churches at home. It is of very great importance that all the churches take steps immediately looking to a large circulation of this magazine.

In addition to the mass of material in tract form, the educational department of the Foreign Mission board calls special at-

tention to the mission study class method. We would urge that a larger number of classes be organized to study the alstest foreign mission board report which will be put into tex-book form, and can be secured from the educational department of the foreign mission board, Richmond, Virginia. This report is a valuable study on our own foreign mission work. We wish that a large number of our men and young people would study the report in mission study calsses or discussion groups, and that the women would see to it that special classes are organized for the men and young people, or that these be invited to the sessions of the women's classes.

In view of the imperative need of re-enforcement on all our foreign fields and the very great importance of meeting the currnt support of this work this year and avoiding another debt, we recommend that this association divide among the churches on an equitable basis the apportionment for this year, and earnestly urge the churches to undertake to raise the amounts asked of them before April 30, 1917.

In order to save the large amount of interest paid out on borrowed money, we earnestly suggest that our churches send in their contributions regularly each month through the regular channels. We recommend the Every Member canvass and Systematic Giving as the Biblical plan for contributing to foreign missions.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Nothing is more clearly taught in the Bible than the fact that God wants us to teach this work to the people. Every time Israel wandered away from God they were brought back largely through teaching. In New Testament times, Jesus and the Apostles made teaching a great factor in the spread of the Gospel. Since the

close of the Bible story, whenever God's people have magnified teaching, His cause has prospered and whenever they have neglected it, His cause has languished. The Sunday school work goes well among Baptists in North Carolina.

In 1916 there were 2,123 schools with a membership of 221,148.

In our association the conditions were as follows: Our Sunday school membership was 77 per cent. as large as our church membership, while for the entire state it was 80 per cent. No Sunday school was reported in Broad River and Cane Creek churches. In 37 churches 1,823 church members were reported in the Sunday school. We have 7,075 members in this Association, which leaves 5,252 not in school.

The Sunday schools gave last year to Missions, Orphanage and other objects \$417.64.

In the state the Sunday schools gave the same to Missions and Benevolence that they gave to home expenses.

In our Association we gave less than this. Let us do our full duty to the great objects of the Convention.

For next year let us make progress along all lines.

We recommend the following as our aims:

1. Definite campaigns for reaching more of our people for our schools.

2. An earnest effort to get our officers and teachers enlisted in the great work of teacher training. Our schools can never be what they should be until we have trained workers.

3. A close touch with the Sunday School Department of our Mission Board.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is located at Atlanta.

The work of the Home Mission Board is of prime importance. Its fields are broad and fertile, and the great harvest is fast ripening and still the crying need is for more means and more men, that the sheaves may be brought in with rejoicing; the achievement of the past, leaves no doubt as to this board's practical value and rich results.

During the past year there were more than 40,000 Baptisms by the missionaries of the board. This is cause for very great rejoicing, and places us under renewed obligations to the Lord of the harvest, but it is only a fragment of what there is yet to be achieved and only the first fruits of what we may expect to reap, if we fear not, and this work must be done for our country's sake and for the glory of our Master. So our watch word is "Onward with Increased Contributions."

J. G. Graham read the report on State Missions. Pending the adoption of this report remarks by J. G. Graham, W. N. Johnson. On motion the Association voted W. N. Johnson thirty minutes to address the Association. On motion amended the report by making State Missions \$1,000,00 for next year. Report adopted.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

The work of the State Board of Missions is one of the most vital problems that the church is facing today.

We recognize that the "marching orders" given by Jesus Christ in the great commissions of the New Testament to the church, are world inclusive, but the starting point, the base and the foundation of world missions, is State Missions. If we fail in the work that lies about our very doors we need not expect to do the work successfully abroad. Success in the work of State Missions means the success of all other kinds of work. In fact, it is only as the stakes of state missions are strengthened and driven deeper that the cords can be lengthened abroad.

The Kingdom lights must burn brightly at home before their rays reach far abroad.

The work of our State Mission Board the past year, under the splendid leadership of our able and efficient secretary, has gone steadily forward. There were 11,568 sermons preached, 319 churches served, 116 out-stations supplied, 2,211 baptisms, 1,583 received by letter, 447 meetings held, 3,487 conversions, 41 church houses built, 11 churches finished, 7 churches organized.

We have 150 missionaries who served in connection with their other work 276 churches. All this work is laid out on a basis of the small sum of \$47,500. This does not include associational and Sunday school missions.

Our State Mission work is divided into three main phases, as follows:

1. Evangelisation, which is the very root and base of our work. Here is where it had it's beginning and here is where it will have the crowning fruit of its success and glory.

Less than half the population of our state are church members—Hence the need of this phase of our work.

2nd. Church Building—Which should go hand in hand with Evangelism. We need church houses in which to gather and ripen the fruits of Evangelism. A body of baptised believers cannot well get along without a house in which to worship. In many sections of the state Baptists are so few and poor that they are absolutely unable to build without help.

3rd. Enlistment. Here is the open sore of our denomination—a phase of our work that has not been stressed until recently. There are about 200,000 white Baptists in N. C. that are not regularly enlisted in the Lord's Kingdom. It is these that the enlistment phase of our work is reaching out after.

Lastly—Our work is hampered for lack of funds. We need at least \$60,000 for State Missions in N. C. To raise this amount, each pastor and church will have to push this phase of our work.

Let us make an earnest effort that we do not fall short of our part of this amount..

We recommend that this Association raise at least \$900.00 for State Missions.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE

In its physical equipment, as well as in the character of its constituency, the Thomasville Orphanage holds a foremost place among the Orphan Homes of the South. For thirty-two years the Home has been growing and is constantly being enlarged and still the task looms before us as just begun.

The unprecedented prices for the necessities of life have made a rocky road for all public institutions, but the Baptist people have been responsive and generous. The past year has been the best in our history, financially. But the fact that it put us out of debt must not lull us to sleep. The high cost of living is putting us in debt again. From month to month we are running behind with our current expenses. Contributions must increase with our needs. Within a few months there will be added to the Kennedy Home another cottage for twenty-five more children. The distress of our times adds its demands upon the Orphanage.

Since the reception of the first child, Nov. 11th, 1885, 1794 have been enrolled, and the present number is 505 (with the prospect of about 530 by the end of the year.) The average yearly cost per child is \$127.75 or 35 cents the day, aggregating a total annual

cost of \$66,046.75. The health record of the children for the past year has been remarkable, there being no deaths and few cases of serious illness.

The graduating class in June numbered twenty-four, being surpassed by only one class in the history of the Orphanage—that of 1916, which numbered twenty-nine. These young men and women turned reluctant steps away from the home of their childhood and are getting ready for the struggle ahead. Some few have entered college but the large majority of them are on the firing line of life's battle for bread.

Mystery veils the future. The struggle to crush Prussianism is the thing that is uppermost in the national thought. Thousands of our boys are preparing to meet the foe on the soil of France. The danger is that in our deep anxiety for the welfare of the nation, and especially for the lives of those so dear to us, we may overlook our obligations to the institution fostered by the denomination. This we must not do. Here is the Orphanage caring for more than 500 of our children. They must be clothed and fed and trained. While the nation is training the soldiers at the various camps for the service of our country, the Orphanage is likewise preparing the young lives under its care for the larger service of winning bloodless battles under the banner of the King of Kings. Our loyalty and liberality to the Orphanage must not be lessened but increased.

Your committee would urge that the Sandy Run Association endeavor to raise not less than \$900.00 during the coming year.

We urge larger giving by the Sunday schools in once a month collections. And we confidently look for a larger increase in the "One day for the Orphanage" thank offering this fall. But for this special effort we would be hopelessly in debt at this time. Without a wide circulation of Charity and Children these results would be impossible, hence we urge an individual copy to as many of our people as possible and a club in every Sunday school.

REPORT ON EDUCATION

Your committee has faith in the right type of education. In it lies the world's hope. The development and influence of the individual, the purity and greatness of the nation, and the progress of Christ's Kingdom all depend upon the instruction and training of the child. Labor saving machinery, on the farm and in the factory; easy means of transportation and swift ways of communication are benefits of an education. Each of us has received untold benefits from the work of educated men.

Upon the PUBLIC SCHOOL largely depends the education of the masses. Our nation must stand or fall with the free-school system; therefore it is our duty, first of all, as Baptists, to encourage and foster the common school system of our country. We should faithfully patronize it, and see that the school is thoroughly equipped, and taught by Christian men and women.

Next in importance is the HIGH SCHOOL. Wherever practical, there should be a HIGH SCHOOL whose course of study should be so adjusted as to prepare pupils for practical life, and to serve as stepping stones to colleges. We appreciate the work of the University. It is doing a needed work. But there is a lack in the educational work of the state, deep and abiding. This lack is found in CHRISTIAN EDUCATION. We believe Christian schools where the Divinity of Christ, the New Birth, freedom of conscience, and individual responsibility to God are emphasized. We believe too, in Christian education under Baptist auspices. For our peculiar and distinctive principles there has been and is a place. We were foremost in America for religious freedom, in England laurels crown the brow of Dr. John Clifford and other Baptists for defeating the iniquitous educational act. It has been left to us largely through the ages to keep before the world a part of the great commission and to reproduce the picture of Jesus in the Jordan. Time has been, too, when we alone, stood for regenerate church membership. These principles were purchased and defended by blood. They are to be perpetuated by our schools. They are well worthy of our hearty support. Our High Schools, Colleges and Seminaries are the strength and pride of our great denomination. Let us foster all of our schools and in a very special manner let us stand by BOILING SPRINGS, WAKE FOREST, MEREDITH, and the LOUISVILLE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY—great schools. To foster and encourage our educational institutions, is the opportunity, as well as the duty of a noble people. Our institutions stand as a monument to the greatness of our de-

nomination; and to send our children to be educated in our denominational schools, and to make every possible sacrifice in their behalf, are among the most pressing and paramount duties of our people to the rising generation and to the KINGDOM OF GOD. Too much importance can hardly be attached to this question. Let us urge our brethren to see to it that their sons and daughters are trained to work, to be USEFUL and SERVICEABLE to THEIR DAY and GENERATION by the WILL OF GOD.

ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BOILING SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL

To the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Baptist Associations:

God has richly blessed your school during the past year as well as throughout its entire history. In submitting this, our tenth annual report, we pray that His guiding hand may ever lead and direct us.

Last Year's Record

Marked progress along all lines was visible, especially in standard of scholarship and in the development of a strong Christian character in the student body.

The total enrollment for the year, ending April 18th, 1917, was 274, an increase of 15 over the preceding year. The number to leave school before commencement was smaller than usual. The parents are to be congratulated on this improvement. The work of the teachers for the year was thorough and satisfactory.

There were sixteen in the graduating class, an equal number each of boys and girls. This brings the total number of graduates from the opening of the school to date to 105, but we should never lose sight of the hundreds who have here laid the foundations for

building noble Christian manhood and womanhood.

The heating plants and water-works, installed in 1915, have given entire satisfaction and have added materially to the comfort and popularity of the school.

The total cost of operating the school for last year, including the boarding department, was \$14,395.23. While the price of food products continued to soar, yet the average price of board for the year was only \$6.50 per month. The popular and efficient matron, Mrs. Lillian M. Rich, is always able to furnish substantial board at minimum cost.

Present Term

The present term opened August 7th, with the largest attendance, for the first day, in the history of the school. The number has steadily increased till now we have an enrollment of 131 boys and 109 girls, making a total of 240. This is 22 in excess of the enrollment at this time last year.

There are three changes in the faculty from last year due to resignations and one additional teacher to handle the overflow in the Music Department. Miss Ollie Moore succeeded Miss Watson in the Intermediate Department and Miss Mabel Quinn succeeded Miss Walser in the Music Department. Since the opening of the term Miss Margaret Dover has been elected Assistant Teacher in Music. Rev. L. M. White, Pastor of the First Baptist church of Shelby, is, at present, the efficient teacher in the Bible Department. Rev. L. W. Swope was elected to this position to succeed Rev. T. C. Holland, who returned to the Seminary, but Bro. Swope was later called into service as Chaplain of the First N. C. Regiment. The Board was fortunate in securing the services of Bro. White until permanent arrangement can be made. No efforts will be spared at any time to make the Bible Department the crowning feature of the school.

Mrs. Rich, the Matron and Inspector of the Boys' Dormitory now occupies rooms in the dormitory building. This arrangement is proving entirely satisfactory, as she has the highest respect for and of the boys. Prof. O. P. Hamrick and wife occupy rooms in the Moore Cottage near by.

The following extract from a recent report by the Principal to this Board is instructive:

"I am pleased to report your school in a most flourishing condition and the health of the students excellent. The class work is very satisfactory.

"Your school continues to grow in public favor as demonstrated by the increased attendance and the widening area of patronage. The total enrollment to date is larger than ever before at this season. The 240 students are classified as follows, to-wit: Primary 30, Intermediate 30, Preparatory 10, Freshman 90, Sophomore 24, Junion 16, Senior 36. There are enrolled in special class-

es as follows: Music 60, Bible Department 36, Domestic Science 10, Expression 8, Art and China Painting 7, Commerce 2. There are 7 Ministerial students. There are 149 boarding students and 91 day students. The area of patronage covers three states—North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia, there being ten counties in N. C. represented.

“Above the sixth grade, there are 155 students who are church members, representing three denominations, and 52 who are non-church members. 34 Churches from the two Associations are represented in the student body, there being an equal number of churches (17) from each Association. The King’s Mountain Association has a small majority in number of students. There are ten teachers in the faculty, four men and six women.”

Old Indebtedness

At last we have reached the goal. The old debt is paid and your school is free. It faces the future with bright hopes. On January 2nd, 1917, the last dollar was paid and the cancelled notes burned in public. The small deficiency in funds available was made up at the time by the members of the Board.

Needed Improvements

Your Board has several times, in former reports, suggested the need of painting the school buildings but finds it necessary now to urge the necessity for immediate action on this line. The main building is deteriorating and a delay means loss. Then from an aesthetic standpoint painting both inside and out is greatly needed.

Your Board further recommends that, at least, \$50.00 be raised at once to equip a laundry for the benefit of the many girls who desire to do their own laundering.

May we not yet hope that God will put it upon the hearts of some of our good men and women to erect on the school grounds a new building to be known as the “Dobbins-Dixon Memorial Building”? By any other name the building would be just as valuable. The need for another building is great but the Board has not the funds with which to build.

Trustees

The terms of the following members of this Board expire this year by limitation, leaving vacancies to be filled as follows:

Kings Mountain Association—W. W. Washburn, J. D. Putnam, Rev. J. W. Suttle, E. C. Borders, and Rev. W. R. Beach. An additional vacancy from this Association for the term expiring in 1918 is made by the removal of G. H. Logan to another Association.

Sandy Run Association—J. J. Edwards, D. M. Harrill, G. B. Pruett, W. A. Martin and Rev. J. G. Graham.

Christian Development

Appreciating the supreme importance of a strong Christian character, your school has and will ever stress Christianity with intellectual development. The usual organizations on this line are fostered in the school and in the local church. All students are required to attend devotional exercises each morning and church and Sunday school each Sunday. We point with special pride to the efficient service that is being rendered the home churches by our students upon their return home. Your board confidently expects to see the day when all churches in these two Associations will have members in training at this school.

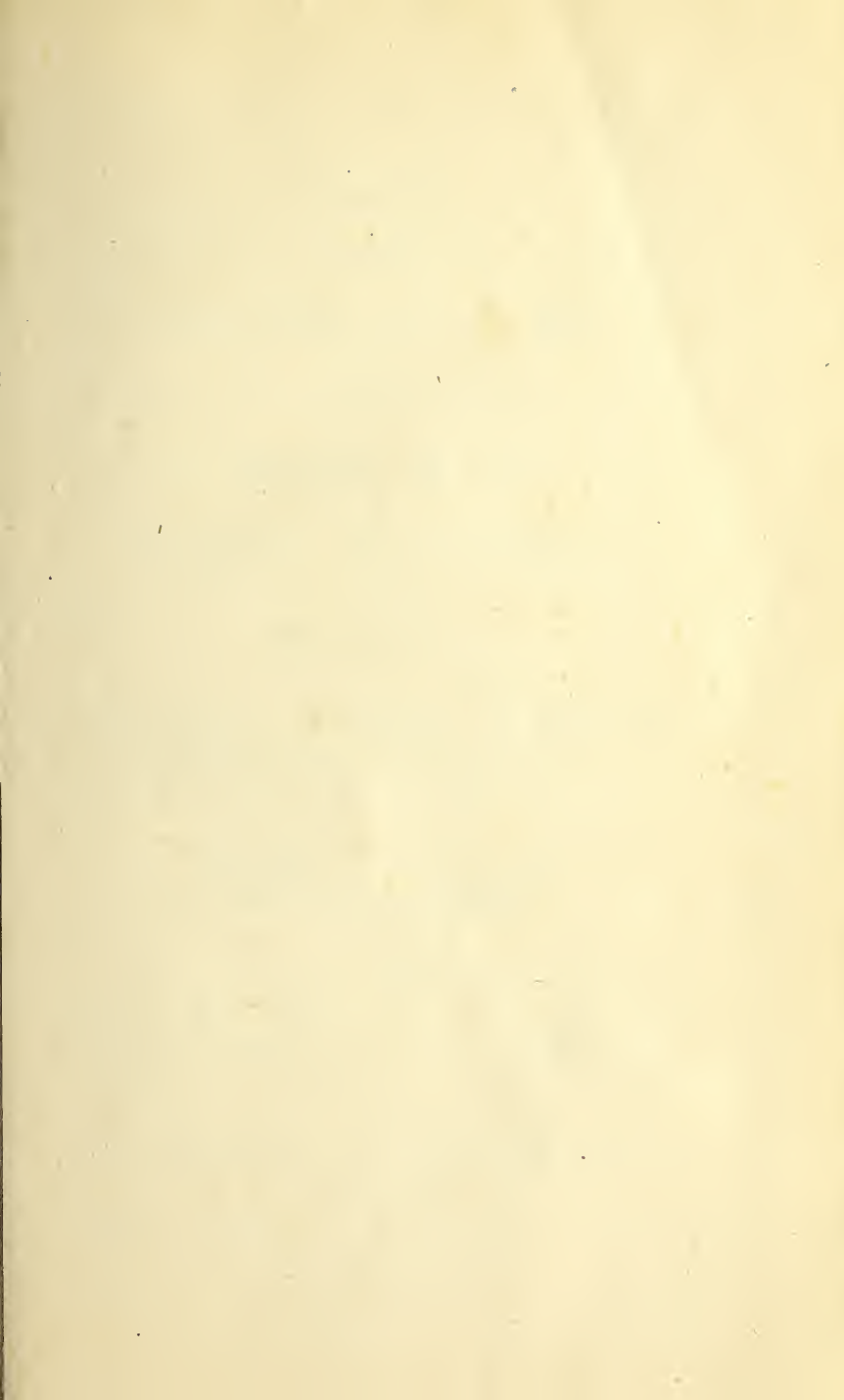

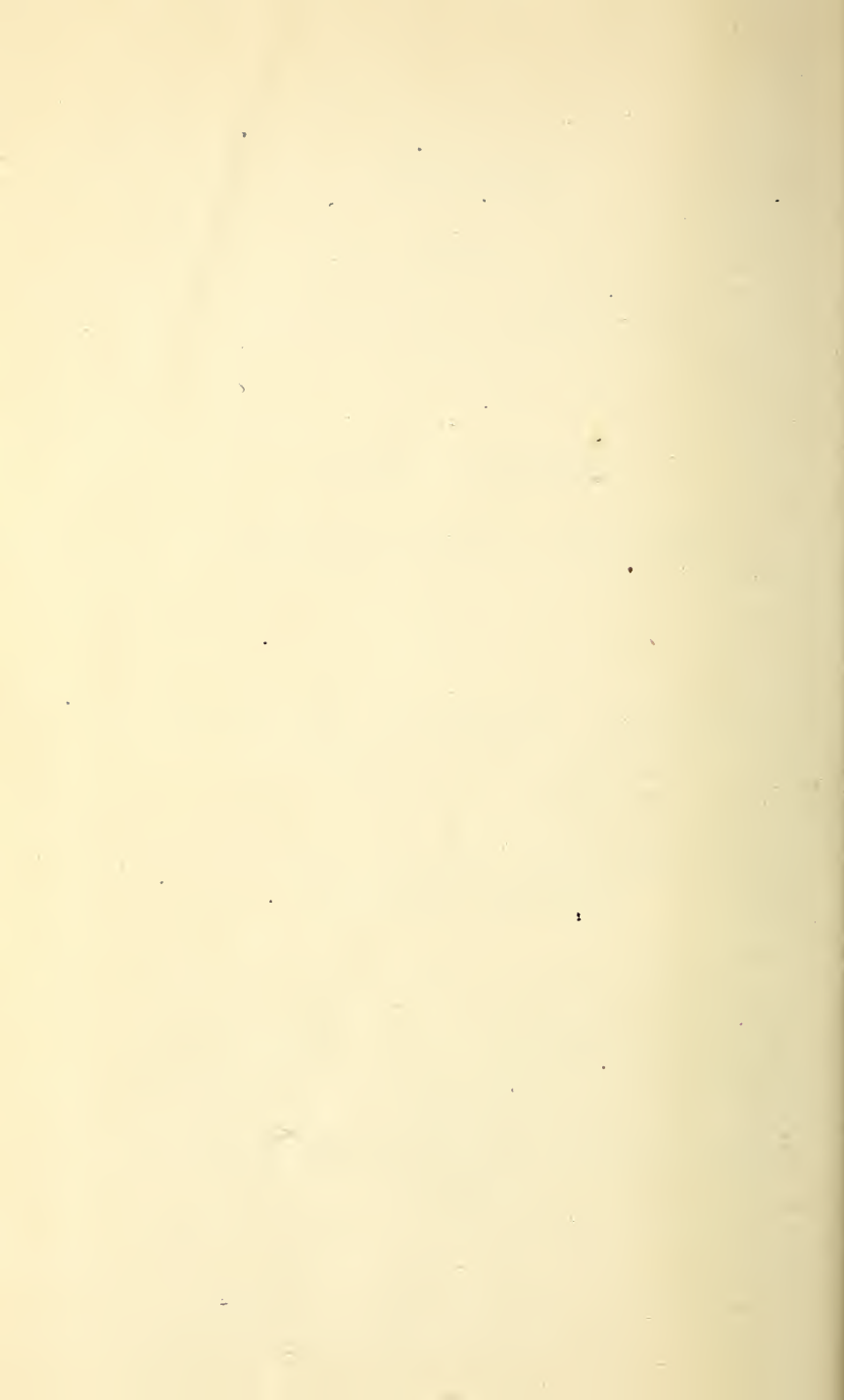

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

Over one-half of the world today is dry territory, and in our own country 27 States have legislative prohibition, still this being true, over 66,000 people die every year in the United States from strong drink.

Lloyd George, Premier of England, recently said of his own country, "We are fighting Germany, Austria, and drink, and, so far as I can see, the greatest of these three deadly foes is drink." Another great thinker has declared, "We must settle the alcohol question within the next ten years or some more virile nation will write the epitaph of this Republic."

Already Congress has passed a law for Nation-wide prohibition for the period of the war, to take effect July 1, 1919. Also a law submitting to the several States of the Union a referendum on national constitutional prohibition. We urge our people to do all in their power to bring this to pass, for we shall certainly need a sober nation to meet the mighty problems that shall confront us when the war closes.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday school work is one of the God-given ways of teaching his Word to the world it being the power of God unto salvation to every one that believes and is the waybill from earth to heaven. Jesus taught by parables. We study his teachings in Sunday school.

The greater part of our country churches today were first a Sunday school and grew into the organization of a church. So one planteth, another watereth but God gives the increase. This part of the work of the Kingdom has been blessed. There are now 2,151 schools in the State with 219,971 on roll. Of this number 113 are branch schools. The membership of schools last year was 78 per cent. of that of the church membership. With 283,000 church members only about 100,000 are in Sunday school.

All churches in this Association report schools last year but Broad River with 3 churches reporting one branch school each, making 43 schools with 5,944 members in school. Of this number 2,142 are church members. With 7,376 church members in the Association leaving 5,234 not in school. Last year this Association reported 354 baptisms with 240 of them from Sunday schools. Contributions from schools seem to increase.

We recommend:

1. That all pastors and workers make an earnest effort to enlist more of our people in schools.
2. Try to have the best trained teachers.

Keep in touch with our secretary, E. L. Middleton, who will furnish all tracts and literature needful to help the school.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

The great importance of State Missions cannot be overestimated because it lies at the very foundation of all missions work. If we fail in the State Missions work we must fail in the home and foreign missions; if we fail at home we must fail abroad.

The object of State Missions work is to establish a Baptist church in every community in the State.

In recent years many good churches have been established and pastors supported in many places and we are looking for more rapid growth in our State Missions work in the future than in the past.

There is great need of work in both the eastern and western parts of our State where there are only about 3 to 4 per cent. of our people are Baptists, 300,000 white Baptists in our State.

Let us not only preach the Gospel but live the same.

The Lord has wonderfully blessed our State Missions and many souls have been saved; we have done much to save the souls but little to save the lives. Our great need is training our people so their lives will count for good.

Resolution introduced by J. W. Rowell. On motion to adopt remarks by J. W. Rowell.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolved: (1) That the Sandy Run Association join heartily with our Board of Missions in the effort to add 12,000 new subscribers to the list of the Biblical Recorder, and that we undertake to secure 250 of these subscribers in this session of the Association; that we apportion to each church of the Association one new subscriber to every twenty of its membership; and that we send statement of its apportionment to each church directly from this Association with the request that the church pass on this matter at its first conference after the Association and that the new subscribers be secured and forwarded at once to the Board of Missions.

(2) That in order to reach some of the people in our churches who do not take the Recorder, and as an aid to our churches in keeping the Recorder and other phases of our work before their members, we recommend that the churches of this Association take a club of the Monthly Bulletin printed by the Board of Missions, each copy enclosing also a great tract, at the rate of \$1.00 per dozen per year.

(3) That this Association co-operate with the Board of Missions in the location and operation of one of the simultaneous and uniform schools of pastors and workers to be held each year within the boundaries of this Association.

H. D. Harrill read the report on Ministerial Relief. Pending the adoption, remarks by H. D. Harrill.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF

It is the purpose of this board to aid aged or wornout ministers who have given the greater part of their lives to the preaching of the Gospel and are now unable to support themselves. There are now 35 ministers and widows of ministers receiving aid and new applications. Your committee would recommend that we increase our contribution to this worthy object. As times and conditions have changed and the cost of living is so much more, therefore, we would suggest that this Association pay not less than \$150.00 to this object so that the board may be able to meet needs of the applicants and have a good conscience.

W. M. Gold read the report on Home Missions. On motion to adopt, remarks by Clifford Campbell of the Kings Mountain Association.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The most urgent mission task that confronts us today is the spiritualization of the life of the New South. The great increase of the South's wealth will crush the souls of the people, if they are not strong enough to master it for spiritual ends. And only a vital religious life and service can do this.

Baptists are now the most numerous evangelical body in America. American Baptists have five-sixths of their members in the South. Here we greatly outnumber any other religious group. Only yesterday, we felt burdened beyond our strength in trying to solve the problem of spiritualizing the South's new wealth. And while the battle was still on, we were swept into the whirlpool of the greatest war in history. No people was ever great enough to overcome the downpull of such overwhelming forces, except as they placed their trust in God and his Christ.

Seeing the great need of a Home Mission program to meet the urgent present needs in America and its armies, the Southern Baptist Convention with devotion and enthusiasm instructed the Home Mission Board practically to double its work. It put the Home Mission apportionment at \$1,000,000. This determination greatly to strengthen Home Missions to meet the spiritual problems that emerge from the war, was one of the most prominent features of the Convention.

In addition to enlarged demands in most of the regular departments of the Home Board's work, there are four special reasons for enlarged Home Mission support right now, each of which appeals to every loyal Baptist.

1. Work for our boys in the army.
2. The hundreds of thousands of people who have been gathered into new towns in the scores of munition and war-work plants in the South.
3. The increased need among our people back home for spiritual leadership and counsel to help them to master the increased burdens and trials from the war.
4. Baptists are joining with others in giving largely to Army Welfare Work, though this is not controlled by any responsible religious denomination. It would be fatal, in doing this good work, to fail to support with equal liberality the definitely spiritual service, controlled and directed by our own denomination. Worthy as are the impulses to provide for the comfort and well being of our boys, to do so at the cost of an adequate quest for their souls would be to turn our backs on the teaching of Christ. The Home Board is increasing its successful work in the army camps. For country and human liberty our boys are giving their all. A loyal Baptist cannot afford to do less and will do no less than his best in helping to guide and stand by these boys in their deepest spiritual longs and needs. We should at least double on gifts to Home Missions, and often more.

Your committee recommends:

1. That all our pastors and churches give frequent special seasons of preaching and praying for Home Missions, and of giving to the work.
2. That this Association gladly accept and apportion among the churches its increased apportionment for Home Missions.
3. That our pastors and women be requested to arouse an interest in the unusually vital Home Mission Study books issued by the Home Mission Board, and to urge the formation of Mission Study Classes in these books.
4. We urge that our pastors and workers order and make a larger use of the splendid free Home Mission tracts issued by our Board.

D. J. Hunt read the report on Orphanage. Remarks by D. J. Hunt, C. J. Woodson.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE

The Thomasville Orphanage was opened on November 11, 1885. This institution has been a great blessing. It has cared for, trained, educated, and fitted 1,860 children for life's work in the past 33 years.

The children are grouped in 15 homes, numbering at present 525. Some months 50 applicants are turned away for lack of room.

The Orphanage property is valued at \$415,000.

The cost to keep a child a year is about \$150.

The receipts from gifts last year was \$83,000, from profits, \$48,000. Total receipts from all sources was \$132,034.64.

Children are received between the ages of two and twelve years.

There are 37 women and 12 men who devote all their time to the institution.

The children work half the time and go to school half the time. The school is first class as is all the work. About 20 girls half the day in each, of the department of work—sewing room, dining room, and the laundry. The boys make about 600 pair of shoes and mend them about three times; they milk 35 cows and do farm work. Handsome profits come from the farm, \$8,000 from the Kenedy farm.

The school has been improved by adding a business course, two class-rooms and a basement.

The health was never better, the contributions never larger.

The orphanage is supported by funds from Sunday schools, churches, Thanksgiving Day, and from Charity and Children.

Your committee would recommend that each Sunday school set apart the collection of one Sunday in each month for the Orphanage.

We further recommend that Thanksgiving Day be set apart as Orphanage Day in each church and that we urge our people to contribute liberally, giving one day's work or its equivalent, to the orphanage.

We recommend that the pastors and superintendents, on Orphanage Day, call attention to it and mention of its needs and urge a liberal collection.

Further we recommend Charity and Children, the official organ of the orphanage. It is worthy of a place in any home. Price per copy, one dollar; in clubs of ten, 60 cents. Every Sunday school should get up a club.

The orphanage gives a chance to invest our money in such a way as to upbuild, train and develop the unfortunate children of the State. No greater opportunity is given us to show the spirit of the Master to uplift humanity than that given at the orphanage.

In conclusion your committee would call your attention to the home-going of Sister W. L. Kenedy, the devoted friend and benefactress of the orphanage.

W. T. Tate read the report on Foreign Missions. Remarks by W. T. Tate.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Southern Baptist Convention in session at Hot Springs in May decided that in order to take care of our Foreign Mission work, Southern Baptists should be requested to give one and a half million dollars to this cause before the next meeting of the Convention. Compared with Southern Baptists numbers and wealth, and with what they are doing for other objects and what others are doing for Foreign Missions, this amount is small.

The Foreign Mission fields represent a thousand millions of people, the most destitute and needy of all the inhabitants of the earth. The work conducted includes everything that our people and our churches are doing at home. A million and a half dollars for this work will not equal a tenth of what we are doing on the same lines for the thirty-odd millions who live in the South, to say nothing of the help which other Christians and denominations are giving to provide religious privileges for the people at home. A million and a half dollars is a great advance upon what we have been doing, and we will have to bestir ourselves to realize it, but it does not measure our full duty in this matter.

God's blessings are upon Foreign Missions. Even the war is helping instead of hindering this great enterprise which Southern Baptists are conducting. There were 6,290 baptisms last year. We have now 464 churches on all the fields, of which 715 Sundays schools enrolling more than 34,000 scholars. In other schools which we are conducting we have enrolled nearly 9,000 scholars. We are conducting theological schools in Japan, China, Africa, Italy, South America. We have but few doctors under appointment, and yet these gave more than 100,000 treatments last year. By His blessing upon the work God is inviting us to enlarge it.

Eighteen new missionaries were appointed in June and many others are greatly needed. Doors of opportunity are open everywhere.

Every pastor and every church in the association is admonished to lay large plans, organize the forces, and press vigorously the greatest campaign we have ever undertaken for Foreign Missions. Every Christian in this nation is at this time called distinctly to this international Christian service. This association should undertake to raise a worthy part of the million and a half dollars, and every church should voluntarily increase its contribution proportionately. The amount of increase for the whole South is 75 per cent. We recommend that the churches of the association attempt the same increase.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Baptists of this state have organized and are sustaining three colleges, to wit: Wake Forest College, Meredith College, and Chowan College. We are also sustaining the following Academies and High Schools: Boiling Springs High School, Fruitland Institute, Haywood Institute, Liberty-Piedmont Institute, Mountain Park School, Round Hill Academy, Sylva Collegiate Institute. The work these schools are doing more than justifies everything that they have cost.

We are all aware that the Baptist of this state have on a campaign to raise a million dollars for Christian Education. A committee was appointed by the Baptist State Convention at its session in Durham last December and charged with the specific task of conducting this campaign. I quote from Dr. W. R. Cullom, general manager of the campaign, the action that was taken by this committee: "After looking the question squarely in the face the committee voted unanimously that those directing the campaign should do two things: (1) They should do everything possible to encourage the purchase of the Liberty Bonds and War Saving Stamps by our people generally. (2) They should put on an intensive campaign during the month of November to get our people to put a million dollars of their investments in government securities into the work of our campaign and in this way put up the million dollars by the time our Convention meets in Greensboro December 3-6."

Your committee recommends that we, the Sandy Run Association, do our utmost to raise our proportional part for this worthy cause. Which is \$23,000.00.

Some are asking why are we so interested in Christian education when there are so many state schools? We see very clearly what the lack of education has done for Russia, and on the other hand, we see what education, that has been misapplied, has done for the world through Germany. When we consider that Europe is today enduring suffering beyond the imagination of man and that this overwhelming disaster is, in a large measure, due to the character of education that has, during the past years, been accorded to the young men of Germany, filling their minds with thoughts of conquest, and world domination, we are overwhelmed with the tremendous importance of giving to the children and youth of our

own land the right sort of education, which will not only cultivate the brain but will develop and train the normal qualities of the young, developing their hearts and directing their thoughts in the right direction. The conflict now being waged is going to bring in its train many new problems, social and religious, which are going to call for the highest and best thought. This situation calls upon the churches to put forth extraordinary effort to properly train its young men and women. We cannot neglect this opportunity without being recreant to our duty and suffering, as all churches do suffer when they fail to discharge their public obligation.

Dr. R. T. Vann says: "Now observe what our Christian colleges are doing for our country. Prof. Eby in his book, 'Christianity and Education', says, 'While the religious schools as a whole have less than one-half the students attending the state and municipal institutions, they have, nevertheless, produced more than four times as many prominent men. President Wilson and Vice-President Marshall were trained in Christian Colleges. Of the nine Justices composing the Supreme Court of the United States, eight are college bred men, and all eight came from Christian colleges. Of the twenty-seven Presidents of the United States, nineteen had college training, and seventeen of the nineteen attended Christian colleges.' "

Vice-President Marshall is quoted as saying in a recent address, "Henceforth our country must look for its leaders mainly to our Christian colleges. For henceforth our people will demand high moral character in their public servants along with intellectual training; and this is more likely to be built in a Christian institution, where character is the chief end, and learning is secondary."

In conclusion I quote again from Dr. Vann: "It appears, therefore, from what has been said that in preserving and enlarging our Christian institutions, we are, (1) Carrying out the oft-repeated teachings of the Bible; (2) Obeying the command of Jesus; (3) Following the example of our Baptist fathers; (4) Supplying an army of trained men and women for the ministry, mission work, and every other form of Christian service; (5) Promoting the growth of our denomination in all lines; (6) Training leaders for the state and the nation under influence as positively Christian as we can make it rather than leaving them to be trained entirely in institutions where Christianity cannot be strongly emphasized."

ANNUAL REPORT BOARD TRUSTEES BOILING SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL.

To the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Baptist Associations:

With profound gratitude to our heavenly Father for His guidance and numerous blessings the Bolling Springs High School, through its trustees, hereby submits its eleventh annual report.

Last Year's Record

Nothing is more pleasing to your board than to be able to report, from year to year, that your school is making continual and substantial progress along all lines, to-wit: in numbers enrolled, in area of patronage, in standards of scholarship, and in Christian influences. Notwithstanding the strenuous times through which we were passing, the enrollment for the year was 272, only two short of the previous year. The school was a little more than self-sustaining, if all is collected that is yet due. The work done both by teachers and students was thorough and satisfactory.

There were 17 in the graduating class, and increase of one over the preceding year, making the largest in the history of the school. Total number of graduates from beginning of school to date, 121. Hundreds of others have here equipped themselves for useful service in life's battles.

The total cost of operating the school last year, including the boarding department, was \$16,163.74, an increase of \$1,768.51 over the previous year. Not an excessive increase, when we consider the marked advance in cost of living. The average price of board for the year was \$8.59 per month, an increase of \$2.09 over the previous year.

Present Term

The current term began August 6th. Early beginning and early closings are found to be advantageous to students from the farm. Notwithstanding the war situation which caused the trustees much anxiety at their last annual meeting as to the attendance this year, the school opened with the largest attendance in its history. The decrease in number of boys of military age is more than compensated for by the increase in number of girls. As yet, we do not know the ultimate effect upon our school of the extension of the draft age to the boys of eighteen. The Committee on Education and Special Training of the War Department is working on a plan by which we hope to be able to organize a corps in our school for military training under the supervision of the War Department similar to that provided for in the colleges. Should

this not materialize, then we will soon lose all boys eighteen and upward.

There are three changes in faculty from last year due to resignation. Rev. W. G. Moore succeeded Rev. L. W. Swope as pastor of the local church and teacher of the Bible Department. Miss Neppie Jones succeeded Miss Margaret Dover as assistant in the Music Department. Miss Etta Banks succeeded Mrs. O. P. Hamrick in the Department of Domestic Science and Expression. These have proven themselves to be valuable additions to the faculty.

The arrangement by which Mrs. Ritch, the matron, took charge of the Boys' Dormitory last year was so successful that it has been continued. Her kindness and gentleness never fail to win the respect of the boys.

The following paragraphs from a recent report to the board by the Principal are instructive:

"Teachers and students are all working hard and are blessed with good health.

"The following is the enrollment by departments for the present term, to-wit: Primary and Intermediate Grades, 76; Freshman Class, 94; Sophomore, 25; Junior, 27; and Senior 22, making a total enrollment to date of 250. Of this number 123 are boys and 127 are girls. The special departments number as follows: Music Department—Voice 10 and Piano 58, seven taking only half time; Commercial Department, 28; Domestic Science and Domestic Art, 28; Expression, 18; Art 2; and Bible Department, 45.

"Four States—North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Virginia—and 17 counties are represented in the student body, 12 of the counties being in North Carolina. Cleveland County is represented by 119 students and Rutherford County by 50. Of those in the Intermediate and High School Departments 172 are church members and 43 are non-members. Of the church members 163 are Baptists, 8 Methodist and 1 Presbyterian."

Improvements

It will be recalled that subscriptions were made at the last session of the two Associations to paint the woodwork on the outside and the interior of the main building. For this purpose \$550.00 were subscribed by the two Associations. Of this sum \$435.80 have been paid, leaving uncollected a balance of \$114.20. The money collected has been applied as follows: for paint and painting woodwork outside, \$210.00; for 40 gallons paint for inside work, \$110.00; and for laundry equipment, \$50.00, leaving a balance on hands of \$65.80. The interior has not been painted for the reason that there were not sufficient funds in sight to pay for the work. It was also discovered that the plastering in many of the rooms would need to be replaced before they are painted. The metal roof also needs a coat of paint. It is estimated that it will cost, to replace the plastering needed and to paint the interior and

roof \$680.00 in addition to the paint now on hand. From this deduct the cash on hand and the unpaid subscriptions from last year and we have a balance of \$500.00 to be raised. We respectfully recommend that subscriptions be taken at once for this sum to be paid by the close of the spring term of the school to the end that the painting be done during the next vacation.

May we repeat again, the school is greatly in need of a new building large enough to house several of the departments and to furnish a commodious auditorium? We are praying that the Lord will open the way for this building at an early date.

Trustees

The terms of the following members of this board expire this year by limitation, leaving vacancies to be filled as follows: Kings Mountain Association—B. T. Falls, T. P. Hamrick, J. Y. Irvin, D. J. Keeter and J. H. Quinn. Sandy Run Association—T. M. Holland, M. M. Green, P. R. Green, A. I. Jolly and G. S. Hawkins. The removal of Rev. J. G. Graham from the Association creates one vacancy for term expiring in 1919.

The non-attendance upon our board meetings of a number of the members is to be regretted.

Advance in Tuition

Realizing the pressing need for an increase in salaries of teachers to meet the increased cost of living, the board, at its recent meeting, appointed a committee to formulate and report at the mid-winter meeting a basis for an increase in tuition for the next year, after conferring with other secondary schools. A plan is also under consideration for adding additional units to the college-preparatory course.

Pastoral Co-Operation

While all the pastors of the two Associations have not been as loyal to your school as they should have been, yet our board is deeply indebted to many of them for their hearty co-operation which has largely increased the patronage of the school. Surrounded as the students are by a Christian atmosphere and under the influence of a Bible Department headed by a thoroughly equipped and consecrated man like Brother Moore, they will be valuable co-workers for their pastors and towers of strength in their home churches.

Report of Woman's Work in this Association. Report adopted.

THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Our Woman's Missionary Union was organized at Caroleen, N. C., October 10th, 1903, with three societies—Henrietta, Caroleen and Forest City. The contributions that year amounted to \$42.15. Mrs. T. G. Hamrick was the first superintendent.

Our Union separated from the General Association in 1912, and held its first separate meeting September 6th, 1912, with the Forest City Baptist church, Mrs. A. H. McDaniel presiding. There were then thirteen societies, raising that year \$500 for missions.

This year our Union met with the Bethel Baptist church at Ellenboro with seventeen women's Missionary Unions represented, and thirteen Young People's Societies. We gave to all objects of the Convention \$900, Mrs. J. G. Graham presiding. At this meeting we pledged ourselves to raise a \$500 memorial fund for the Church Building and Loan of the Home Mission Board, to perpetuate the memory of the soldier boys who may fall in the fight for freedom.

Another aim of our W. M. U. this year is to have a missionary society and Children's Mission Band in every church in the Sandy Run Association, that we may reach the more than four thousand unenlisted women in the churches of this association.

Let our watch-word be, "That I May Know Him," (Philippians 3:10.) Let our chief aim be, Individual and United Prayer; Regular Bible and Mission Study; Systematic and Proportionate giving; and Organized, Personal Service.

We again definitely declared on the side of those forces that make for righteousness; loyally upholding the policies of our government; working for National Temperance; maintaining Sabbath Observance; keeping the home inviolate, urging more general re-establishment of the family altar; assisting in the crusade for health, education, purity, and observance of the law.

H. D. Harrill read the report on Biblical Recorder. Pending adoption, remarks by H. D. Harrill and W. R. Beach.

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER

For 86 years the Biblical Recorder has been the organ of the Baptist State Convention in North Carolina. During all these years it has stood for the faith as we Baptists hold it and has given its influence to the promotion of every task to which we have set our hands. Our denomination would not be the power it is in our State today had it not been for the influence and inspiration of the Biblical Recorder. As an evidence of the value of the Recorder to the denominational work we have but to note the fact that the 75 Million Campaign Committee put on a canvass throughout the South in the interest of all the Baptist papers. Director General Scarborough frankly said that this movement could not succeed without the aid of the papers. If the denominational papers are worth so much to the cause in a special emergency does it not argue that they are of great value in all our regular work?

The Campaign Committee in Raleigh has made arrangements with the business manager of the Recorder whereby the paper is to go into every Baptist home which was not taking it until the first of January. The Committee considered the advisability of publishing a weekly paper to be distributed freely, but upon investigation they found that it would be cheaper and in their opinion more effective to pay for the Recorder for 3 months, and have it sent to those who are not now subscribers.

Let us hope that very many of these, if indeed not all of them, will subscribe for the paper at the beginning of next year in order that it may continue its visits to them.

The Recorder has made a proposition to send the paper to churches at reduced rates provided it is put into the budget and

goes into all the families of the church. The budget plan works in this way: A church will agree to set aside a sufficient amount as Recorder fund, to put the paper at \$1.50 in every home. For instance, if there are 20 homes, a check sent to Mr. J. S. Farmer, the business manager, for \$30.00 will secure the Recorder for one year. The paper will not be sent in bundles as Charity and Children is, but will be sent direct to those whose names are sent and will reach them just as if they were individual subscribers. Instead of subscribing to the paper and paying \$2.00, those who now subscribe would contribute to the Recorder fund. If all are not taking the paper now it would be necessary, of course, to supply this amount by taking collection in the church just as is done for any of the objects of the Convention.

Whatever plan the churches may adopt we trust that many more of our people than are now doing so may secure and read the Biblical Recorder.

M. M. Huntley read the report on State Missions.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

All missions is our work. There is one Lord commanding us to do it. There is one appeal, a lost world calling to us for it. One motive behind it, the Love of God.

But for convenience it is divided into three departments of administration: Foreign, Home and State Missions. The work of State Missions is to transform the lives of the people of North Carolina with the gospel of Jesus Christ. This work is administered by the Board of Missions, Raleigh, N. C. The board is seeking to raise for this work this year \$50,000. We gave last year \$45,273. The following is some data of the work on the mission field: Churches served, 283; number of missionaries, 161; contributions, \$2,851; baptisms, 1,765; received by letter, 2,215; average Sunday School attendance, 17,264; mission study classes, 77; men in mission study classes, 256; houses of worship building, 37; houses of worship built, 11; churches organized, 14; number of delegates attending denominational meetings, 1,208; number of business meetings this year, 1,720; pastoral conferences, 133; every member canvass, 178; sermons, 11,028. Our State Mission

work is now divided into five departments.

1. Evangelization. This is the most important part of the work of all missions. 160 men worked in this department last year.

2. Church building, aiding weak churches in erecting houses of worship.

3. Sunday Schools. This department is not supported out of State Mission funds, but is closely connected with it. Supported by the Sunday School Board Secretary, E. L. Middleton, Raleigh, N. C., is the leader.

4. B. Y. P. U. The Sunday School teaches the word of God, the B. Y. P. U. trains them for services. The Sunday School and State Boards combined support this work.

5. Woman Missionary Union trains Sunday School teachers to know. The B. Y. P. U. trains the W. M. U. does. The women of North Carolina last year gave \$63,101.75 to Missions.

W. T. Tate read the report on Home Missions.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The influence of America in shaping world-ideals today is unequalled by any other nation. Sound missionary policy requires that we shall really make America Christian. Baptists of the South have in the Home Mission Board an agency of marked efficiency through which they are bringing to bear their combined efforts to that end.

A great work of soul-winning still confronts us in the South, where about 20,000,000 persons make no profession of religion, though the South is better evangelized than any other section of the country. Our Home Missionaries lead those of all other denominations in the work of soul-winning. 40,000 Converts were added to the churches last year through their labors. We rejoice that during the present year the Board's strong evangelistic service is being enlarged still more.

The reproach of 3,000 unhoused Baptist churches in the South is being removed by direct gifts and by the Million Dollar Loan Fund of our Board. A great service is being rendered through our large system of mission schools to the belated people in mountain districts of the South.

One of the greatest tasks before Southern Baptists is the nurturing of many of our churches, through adequate preaching services and pastoral work, whose members are second to none in their sound Americanism and evangelical faith, but who have not

been adequately taught in the life of faith. Our Home Board, after six years of effort in this new field, is substantially enlarging the enlistment work.

In the field of Indians, Foreigners and Negroes, the Board is enlarging its service to meet enlarging opportunities. In its co-operative work with State Boards, especially in the relatively younger States, it is doing the largest work in its history. In Cuba and Panama the Board's work shows a healthy growth, a full return in spiritual fruits for the money we have given to it.

Adjusting itself to the enlarged effort made possible by the \$75,000,000 Campaign, the Board is expending \$1,500,000 this year, much of it in needy strategic places it was not before possible to enter.

We heartily commend our Board for the vigorous and able stand of Dr. B. D. Gray, its Corresponding Secretary, and his associates, to safeguard the fundamental principles of religious liberty and justice, when these were threatened by forces which used the occasion of the war to betray our American freedom of faith. The service of our Secretary and our Board in this emergency was invaluable.

These days of reconstruction are a time of severe testing to the character and Christian faith of our people. With our whole heart we rejoice that the Southern Baptist Convention has in the \$75,000,000 Campaign provided \$12,000,000 to be used by our Home Board in evangelizing and Christianizing the South. REPORT ON ORPHANAGE

It is not worth while to give an account of the beginning of the Orphanage. We want to look at it now, calculate its future, and get to the task of making it what the Baptists of North Carolina need. We are now taking care of more than five hundred children, feeding, clothing and teaching them. Our equipment for this work is extensive, but not sufficient to meet the demands made upon us, for children without homes and helpless and dependent on others, are crying to us for help and we are not prepared to answer that cry as we should, therefore, the Thomasville Orphanage should appeal to us in such ways as to cause us to rise with our means and provide for all the helpless Baptist children in the State. Great good has come to hundreds already. Thousands more need the help just as much and should have it. We therefore do the other work, such as saving the lost by the different means, but we must not leave this undone.

Therefore, we insist that churches and Sunday Schools make regular contribution to this worthy object in a very liberal way.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF

The Baptist Ministers' Relief Board was established twenty-nine years ago. During that time it has brought relief to one hundred and twenty-nine needy beneficiaries—ministers and widows of ministers. There are at present forty-two on the Board. There are several applicants pending, showing that the increase of beneficiaries may be expected to continue. The beneficiaries receive from twenty-five to two hundred dollars per year. Many of them need more. Some of them have no other means of support. That the aid extended may be adequate to the needs of the beneficiaries, it is frequently necessary to increase the appropriations.

It is the aim of this Board that no one who has been a worthy proclaimer of God's truth shall suffer for the necessities of life. We desire that every Baptist of the State shall share this ambition with us, and contribute towards its accomplishment. Many of our people already give gladly to this work, but many of the churches of the State contribute nothing.

We do, therefore, urge that each church of this Association make regular contributions to this object, just as to State Missions and Orphanage, and that the amount to be equal to five per cent of the amount paid to the pastor. Our last meeting of the Convention recommended that every church in the State give to Ministers' Relief an amount equal to five per cent of the salary it pays its pastor.

In accord with the recommendation of the Baptist State Convention at its meeting at Wilson, we urge, in the second place, that each pastor present the needs and worthiness of this object to his people, and that a special collection for this work be taken on the Sunday nearest to Christmas on which the church may have services. Let it be clearly understood, however, that the Christmas offering is a special offering, not to be used to pay the church's pledge to this object, but separate and distinct from it. A Christmas check is sent to each beneficiary.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

dollars. North Carolina is asked for six million. Our association is asked for one hundred forty thousand the next five years. About twenty thousand of this amount has been raised.

In view of these facts your committee would recommend:

First: That the churches of the Sandy Run Association accept cheerfully their allotment of the seventy-five million campaign which is one hundred forty thousand.

Second: That the campaign for the memorial building at Boiling Springs be completed as early as possible, and make Boiling Springs High School one of the best schools in the South.

ANNUAL REPORT TRUSTEES BOILING SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL

To the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Baptist Associations:—

Greatful to our heavenly Father for his numerous blessings upon our beloved institution, the trustees of the Boiling Springs High School hereby submit their twelfth annual report.

Last Year's Record

It will be recalled that your school opened in the fall of 1918 with the largest enrollment, to that date, in its history, notwithstanding the call of the boys of 18 and upwards for military service. While the epidemic of influenza struck us in the early fall, causing a suspension for twelve days, yet we did not suffer as much as many other institutions. At one time, we had about forty cases in the school but all recovered. Two of our students died of influenza soon after entering the army. The attendance throughout the year was more irregular than usual, owing to the fact that many students were called home from time to time on account of sickness in the home. This naturally demoralized school work to some extent and made the work difficult both for teachers and students.

There were enrolled last year 141 boys and 174 girls, making a total of 315 students. There were 26 in the graduating class, of these 12 were girls and 14 boys. The total number of graduates from the beginning of the school to date, 147. Hundreds of others, who did not graduate were here trained for life work.

The total expenses of operating this school last year, including the boarding department, was \$20,908.45, an increase of \$4,744.71 over the previous year. This increase was due both to the increased attendance and to the high cost of living. The average price of board last year was \$9.99 per month, an increase of \$1.40 over the previous year. The first month this year's board was \$9.96.

While the many interruptions last year materially decreased the income of the school, yet it was self sustaining if all accounts due from last year are collected.

Present Term

Long before the opening of the present term, it was clearly apparent to the management that we would have an overflow of students this year. This expectation was fully verified when the school opened on Aug. 12. Every available space in the dormitories and in the private homes in the nearby community is occupied, and still they come. With sincere regret we have been forced to reject students who desired to enter as our accommodations are taxed to the limit. Only twelve years of age, our school has grown in public favor and influence beyond the most sanguine expectations of its friends, for which we most humbly thank God. But increased patronage necessarily calls for enlarged equipment. We must go forward or we will go backward; there is no neutral ground. Are we ready to meet our responsibility?

Teachers

There are several changes in faculty from last year. Mrs. Euzelia Hamrick Barry, who had served the school so long and so efficiently in the department of Latin, resigned, to the regret of the Board and of the patrons of the school, and was succeeded by Miss Mary Frances Lide, A. B., of Winthrop College. Miss Ollie Moore, an efficient teacher in the intermediate department, resigned and was succeeded by Miss Ethel Wofford, A. B., of Limestone College, who, for several years has been the popular teacher in the primary department of this school. Miss Aquilla Lovelace a graduate in music of Limestone College, succeeded Miss Neppie Jones, as Assistant in the music department. Miss Leila Moore, A. B., of Limestone College, succeeded Mrs. O. P. Hamrick as teacher of art and china painting. Two additional teachers have been added, to-wit: Miss Avarie M. Martin, A. B., of Meredith College, department of History, and Miss Della Stamey, a graduate of the Southern Conservatory of Music, second assistant in music department. The faculty now consists of three men and eight women, and plans are arranged for adding another teacher at an early date.

In order to pay our teachers living salaries, the Board found it absolutely necessary to make a slight increase in tuition charges this year.

Report of The Principal

We are pleased to quote the following paragraphs from a recent report of the Principal to the Board: "It is with pleasure that we report your school in a most flourishing condition. The attendance has reached the capacity, a number of students have been denied admission because we could not board, house, or teach them satisfactorily.

The enrollment to date, by classes, is as follows: Seniors 31, Juniors 52, Sophomores 59, Freshman 127, Preparatory 48, and Specials 4, making a total of 331. Although the Primary Department in which 39 were enrolled last year has been abolished and while this is only the second month of the term, yet we have 58 more enrolled than were ever before enrolled in a whole year.

In the Special departments are as follows: Music 113, Art 16, Household Arts 31, Expression 14, and Bible. There are 9 Ministerial Students.

Six Protestant denominations are represented in the student body, while there are 89 non-communicants.

Our patronage is distributed as follows: From the Kings Mountain Association 151 and from Sandy Run 74; from Cleveland county 178 and from Rutherford county 69. Ten counties in North Carolina and six in South Carolina are represented, as are seven states, to-wit: North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Virginia, New Jersey, and Texas.

We have been forced to add two additional teachers—one in the Music and the other in the Literary Departments—and still there is much work for all.

I am pleased to report that the school has been placed upon the list of Standard High Schools and that the states has this year employed Prof. I. C. Griffin, of Shelby, N. C., to teach Education to our senior class. Upon graduation, our students will be given a First Grade Teachers Certificate without examination and will be able to enter our highest institutions of learning without examination.

By God's guidance and the co-operation of His people, the future of your school is assured."

The Memorial Building

It will be recalled that this Board, in several recent reports, has emphasized the need of a new building. The increased attendance last year rendered immediate action imperative. So your Board, at a Special Meeting in January last, after careful and prayerful consideration, decided, upon the approval of the Executive Committees of both Associations, to take immediate steps for a new building. Both Executive Committees promptly gave their assent. A Special Committee was appointed and clothed with power to raise the funds and erect the building.

About the same time the people everywhere were looking for suitable ways and means for commemorating the deeds of those who had so recently offered their young lives upon their country's alter. No longer content with a cold and lifeless shaft of marble or granite, the age calls for something that is of intrinsic value as a memorial. Hence the happy thought of erecting a worthy memorial on our school grounds to be used for school purposes. The building is to be a memorial for all present and former stu-

dents of the school together with all persons within the territory of the two Associations who were inducted into any branch of the army or navy during the recent war, also for the mothers who gave them birth. Rev. O. L. Stringfield was, for a few weeks, in charge of the campaign to raise the funds for the building, but he left us July 1st to fill some previous engagements for the summer. Since his departure, the pastors have been too busy in revival services to press the campaign in their churches. So less than a fourth of the 82 churches in the two Associations have been worked. The estimated cost of the building, at this time is \$40,000. As best can tell, about half this amount has been subscribed, leaving approximately \$20,000 to be raised in the remainder. We recommend the adoption of some plan by which this movement may be consolidated with the 75 Million Dollar Campaign.

Brethren, with your school taxed to its limit and others knocking for admittance, you cannot and you will not fail to provide for this building at once in some way. Then, a memorial should be erected to our brave sons while their acts and deeds are fresh in memory, "Lest we forget, lest we forget!"

Plans and specifications for the building have been drawn by a first class architect, Mr. J. M. McMichael.

Recent Additions to Equipment

Each year calls for numerous indispensable improvements. A water and sewerage system is being installed in the Boys' Dormitory and a new boiler has been added to the heating plant at same building. A new engine and pump have been placed at the well. A large quantity of furniture has been purchased for rooms in the dormitories and in rooms for students in private homes. The cost of these improvements aggregate about \$2,000.00.

We are pleased to report that the school, without expense to this Board has just purchased a Concert Grand Piano for the auditorium, the price of which was \$1600. One other second-hand piano has been purchased and two others rented to meet the growing demands of the music department.

Other Needed Improvements

While the Memorial Building will greatly relieve the pressure upon our present equipment, yet we greatly need a new dormitory for boys and we earnestly hope the Lord will soon open up the way by which this building may be secured, also.

It will be re-called that the churches of the two Associations, at their last session, pledged to pay to the school a sum equal to five cents for each member to defray the expenses of painting the interior of the building, to pay the premium for insuring the property, and for other expenses. A few of the churches have paid these pledges while many have overlooked same. If your church has not paid its pledge, please arrange for it at your next meeting

without fail. We cannot depend upon the income of the school to meet permanent improvements.

To avoid the constant necessity of appealing to the Associations for special pledges to meet extra expenses, we recommend that all the churches of the two Associations adopt, as a fixed rule, the contribution annually of a sum not less than five or ten cents for each member for the benefit of the school, said contributions to be paid on or before the opening of the Association each year. Such contributions would be in the nature of an endowment and would take care of the ordinary expenses incurred for equipment and repairs.

Trustees

The terms of the following members of this Board expire this year by limitation, leaving vacancies to be filled as follows: Kings Mountain Association—L. S. Hamrick, J. F. Moore, E. E. Hamrick, Carme Elam, and N. B. Hamrick. Sandy Run Association—Rev. W. T. Tate, J. J. Edwards, D. M. Harrill, G. B. Pruett, and W. A. Martin.

Some members of the Board rarely attend a meeting of the Board. This is very unfortunate.

As ours is a co-educational institution, it might be well for the Associations to take under consideration in the future the matter of placing women on the Board.

Endowment

We are especially pleased to report the beginning of what we hope will soon be a substantial endowment for the school—a thing so much needed at this time. At the last annual commencement of the school, the announcement was made by his pastor that Bro. J. L. Putnam, of Zoar church, had contributed \$1,000 toward an endowment for the school. This was without solicitation from any source. This money is now loaned on real estate security. The Board extends to Bro. Putnam its sincere appreciation for this noble and generous act. Long after he shall have gone home to Heaven, this money will be helping to develop Christian manhood and womanhood in this country. In this connection, we desire to express our appreciation to the student body of last year for its donation to this fund of a \$100 Liberty Bond and a small cash collection. It is to be hoped that the Holy Spirit will lead other men and women to follow the example of Bro. Putnam in contributing to this fund and thereby building to themselves a monument more lasting than granite. Forced to compete with schools in which tuition is free, our Christian institutions must have endowment.

Conclusion

This report would be incomplete were we not to renew our expression of appreciation to the pastors of the two Associations for their hearty co-operation at all times. In so doing, they are

materially aiding in developing strong Christian workers in the local churches. By bringing these young men and young women into the Christian atmosphere of this school and under the influence of a Bible Department headed by a teacher of Bro. Moore's equipment and consecration, they are developing efficient soldiers for the Master's service.

RESOLVED, 1st, That we, the Board of Trustees of the Boiling Springs High School, in Special Meeting assembled on this the 25th day of September, 1919, hereby extend to the Gaston County Association, when it shall have been duly organized, an invitation to endorse and adopt the Boiling Springs High School as its associational school and to co-operate with the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Associations in owning, operating, and maintaining said School on such basis as shall hereafter be worked out by this Board of Trustees and a special Committee to be appointed for this purpose by the Gaston County Association.

2d. That the granting of letters to churches of Gaston County by the Kings Mountain Association to join the new Association shall not disqualify members of such churches to hold positions on this Board until the next annual meeting of the Kings Mountain Association.

3d. That the foregoing resolutions shall be without force or effect until approved in due form by both the Kings Mountain and the Sandy Run Associations.

W. T. Tate read the report on the 75 Million Dollar Campaign
REPORT ON 75 MILLION CAMPAIGN

The Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Atlanta, Ga., in May, with twice as many messengers in attendance as at any former meeting, determined with unity of purpose and loyalty of spirit to raise 75 million dollars in the next five years for the enlargement of their work in missions, education, and benevolence. The following considerations evidently led them to propose this mammoth movement for Christ:

1. The vastness of the World War and the greatness of America's part in reconstruction, put on Southern Baptists a new and limitless responsibility in the world's spiritual regeneration.

2. Baptist conviction and polity demanding a course of separation from the unionizing and confederating movements about them, made Baptists see that if they are to go straight on in the New Testament determined course, and carry out Christ's demand on them in the world's spiritual regeneration, they must multiply their efforts to enlarge their work.

3. Their great numbers, with increasing wealth, brought to them a sense of great responsibility, and conscious of the depth of their convictions and unity, and the power of a Southwide co-operation, they saw afresh the vision of a great task.

4. They realized as never before the need of larged equipment for all their churches, schools, orphanages, hospitals, and other agencies, both at home and abroad, and saw the vast opportunity this strengthened program would give them.

5. They saw anew that if democracy is to be made safe for the world, the peoples of the earth must be enlightened and that this democracy must be dominated by the spirit of the gospel of Christ.

6. They saw a larger duty to aged ministers, heroes of the cross, who have fought against odds with a sacrifice greater than we are asked to make, and included in this campaign, a Southwide movement to establish an adequate fund for their relief.

7. A deeper compassion for lost souls swayed the hearts of our people throughout the South, and compelled them to redouble their efforts to save them.

What Will Success In This Campaign Do With Baptists?

1. It will call us to prayer as never before. If we are to win, we must do it by the way of the Throne, through importunate supplication.

2. It will test our faith, and we will hear Him saying unto us: "Be it unto you according to your faith." We will thus

make it modern Baptist history another Eleventh Chapter of Hebrews.

3. It will test our unity and the efficiency of our organization. We will never impair the doctrine of the rights of the individual conscience and the independence of the local churches, but we will magnify and manifest to the world the unifying power of a common faith, convictions and purpose, in our effective mobilization of all the spiritual forces in our democracy under the Lordship of our only Master.

4. The success of this campaign will fathom the depths of our sacrificial giving, and tell how we decide between Christ and money.

What Will the Campaign and the Successful Issue of it Do for Baptists

1. It will enable them to greatly multiply and strengthen their missionary agencies at home and abroad.

2. It will almost double the efficiency of our Christian schools.

3. It will enable Baptists to increase their hospital efficiency, for the cure of the sick and the suffering, and enlarge our facilities for the support of hundreds of orphans who cry daily for our care.

4. It will bring to us a spirit of revival quickening. It will call out the called. It will deepen our passion for lost souls, enlist the indifferent, and engage us all for larger service.

5. It will provide Baptist a better opportunity to deliver their message and set forth doctrines of the rights of conscience, separation of church and state, the integrity of the Scripture, the Lordship of Christ, and the freedom of the local churches under Him, from any lordship of popes, priests, bishops, and all other ecclesiastical autocracies.

The Executive Committee has apportioned the 75 Million to the states. Our state apportionment is \$6,000,000. Our state forces have been apportioned to our association \$140,000, and this amount has been divided among our churches. As loyal servants of our Lord, and faithful messengers of His gospel, we are asked to join this movement with the most cooperative spirit and in the most self-sacrificing way.

We, therefore, heartily recommend that this association accept joyfully its apportionment, and that we pledge ourselves to aid in effecting the best organization possible for the raising of our quota until success crowns our cause and then join in jubilant praise to God for Victory.
