The Presbytery of Wilmington met in Called Session in the First church, Wilmington, N. C., May 6, 1952, at 2:30 p.m. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. Robert L. McBath. The following members were enrolled: Ministers—R. L. McBath, J. S. Crowley, S. M. Houck, J. M. Newbold, Jr., M. G. Stimson, L. A. Taylor, R. L. Turner, J. M. Waggett, J. W. Ware. Ruling Elder—R. C. Platt, Jr.

A quorum was declared present. The Presbytery was constituted with prayer led by Rev. R. L. Turner. The call for the meeting was read, found in order, and made the docket for the meeting:

“The requirements of the Book of Church Order having been met, I hereby issue the call for Wilmington Presbytery to meet in the Session room of the First Presbyterian church, Wilmington, N. C., on Tuesday, May 6, 1952 at 2:30 p.m., for the purpose of transacting the following business: 1—Endorse the application of the Tabor City church for a loan from Synod for the purpose of constructing a manse; 2—Fill a vacancy and elect a Chairman of the Board of World Missions.”

A motion was duly made and seconded that upon recommendation of the Home Mission Committee, Presbytery endorse the application of the Tabor City church for a loan in the amount of \$5,000.00 from the loan funds of the Home Mission Committee of the Synod of North Carolina. The motion carried.

Rev. J. A. Nisbet was elected to membership on the Committee on World Missions to succeed the Rev. C. R. Stegall. Rev. D. A. Bowles was elected chairman of this committee.

The minutes of the meeting were read, corrected and approved. Presbytery adjourned with prayer by Rev. M. G. Stimson.

The call for the meeting was read and found in order as follows: The requirements of the Book of Church Order having been met, I hereby issue the call for a meeting of Wilmington Presbytery to be held in the St. Andrews-Covenant church, Wilmington, N. C., at 3:00 p.m., for the purpose of ordaining candidate Preston C. Oliver and granting him permission to labor outside of the boundaries of the Presbytery, if the way be clear.

Presbytery was constituted with prayer, led by Rev. N. G. Stevens. Rev. Walter Goodman, moderator in nomination, requested that he be excused from serving at this meeting due to a funeral engagement in the early afternoon. His request was granted and Rev. Neill G. Stevens was elected Moderator.

Newly elected Ruling Elders from various churches were introduced to the Presbytery and welcomed by the Moderator.

Rev. Marshall S. Woodson, President of Flora Macdonald College and a member of Fayetteville Presbytery, and Rev. Harold J. Dudley, General Secretary of the Synod of North Carolina and a member of Albemarle Presbytery, were introduced and invited to sit as visiting brethren.

Communications were read and referred as follows: from the Board of Annuities and Relief, on the subject of group life insurance, to the Committee on Annuities and Relief; from Flora Macdonald College thanking Presbytery for financial assistance; from C R O P requesting time for a speaker, request granted and speaker docketed; from Rev. William Crowe, Jr., chairman of a special committee appointed to express thanks of Presbytery to Dr. W. C. Mebane. This was read and adopted by the Presbytery; from Rev. G. Fenton Miller asking permission to demit the ministry, laid on the table until the next meeting of Presbytery; from Harold J. Dudley requesting Presbytery to change the dates of its stated meetings, placed on the docket.

A proposed Docket for the meeting was presented by the Stated Clerk. It was amended and adopted.

The host-pastor, Rev. W. H. Allison, welcomed the members of the Presbytery and announced arrangements for their entertainment.

Mr. Eugene Davis, a member of the Mount Olive church and a student in Davidson College, appeared before Presbytery asking to be admitted as a candidate for the ministry. He was presented by Rev. W. H. Allison, chairman of the Committee on Candidates, who reported that the necessary papers were in his hands and were satisfactory in

all respects. Mr. Davis was admitted to examination. The examination on Experimental Religion and Motives for seeking the Gospel Ministry was conducted by Rev. Carl Craig. The questions from the Book of Church Order were addressed to the candidate by the Moderator and a charge was delivered to the candidate by his pastor, Rev. B. E. Dotson. Prayer was offered by the Moderator, and the name of the candidate was placed on the roll of the Presbytery.

The Committee on Annuities and Relief reported through the chairman, Rev. W. H. Allison. The report was adopted as follows:

ANNUITIES AND RELIEF

1. For 12 years the Ministers' Annuity Fund has operated successfully. It has met in full every commitment, and the actuaries and auditors report it in good actuarial and financial condition. Benefits paid since the fund began are \$1,641,253.47. Annuitants receiving benefits as of March 31, 1952 were 240 ministers, 245 widows, and 48 orphans.

2. The Employees' Annuity Fund has enrolled 216 members, and there were 6 annuitants receiving benefits as of March 31, 1952.

3. During the past year 372 homes were aided from the funds of Ministerial Relief. This was a decrease of 18 homes from the number aided the previous year. The amount remitted to the home of these beneficiaries was \$184,996. In addition \$159,531.10 of the fund of Ministerial Relief was used to supplement the inadequate annuities of 318 annuitants. The total amount granted to beneficiaries of Ministerial Relief and annuitants was much in excess of that of any previous year, but the Board is convinced that it is still not enough to relieve the retired ministers and their dependents of the burdens of the high cost of living.

4. The General Assembly has asked that 8% of the total amount requested for its benevolent work for 1952-53 be given by the churches to the Board of Annuities and Relief. Since the major source of income with which the board carries on its relief work is the Joy Gift, it is urgent that this annual offering be a generous one if the board is to have the funds with which to provide the necessities of life for the retired ministers. The total receipts for the relief work during the year 1951-52 amounted to \$528,537.79.

5. Acting upon instructions given to it by the General Assembly the board has presented to the church a proposed group life insurance plan for the protection of its full-time salaried personnel. This plan has now been approved by the 1952 General Assembly and the required number of subscriptions have been received, so the plan was supposed to go into operation on July 1, 1952. Ministers and churches desirous of obtaining the type of protection which the plan affords should forward their subscription blanks, with check for the proper amount attached, at the earliest possible date.

6. Wilmington Presbytery has three beneficiaries of Ministerial Relief at the present time. Wilmington Presbytery contributed a total of \$4,991 to Ministerial Relief during the past church year.

Annuities and Relief

The Committee on Educational Institutions was submitted by the chairman, Rev. William Crowe, Jr. Pending the adoption of the report, Presbytery heard President Marshall S. Woodson in an address on the progress of Flora Macdonald College. The report, with the recommendation that it be read from every pulpit of Presbytery, was adopted as follows:

EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Presbyterians no longer have the concern for Christian education they once had. An outstanding cause is that leadership at the local level has not kept itself aware of the tremendous changes taking place in the educational world and of the continuing need in our civilization for the small church related college. By local leadership we are referring chiefly to sessions. Pastors come and go but sessions remain. We have no statistics to support our belief but we do believe that Ruling Elders who read denominational periodicals are greatly overshadowed in numbers by those who seldom read them. Informed Sessions could have done much to prevent our church from losing its concern for Christian education. We believe this would have been more effective than the mass movements attempted in recent years administered by overhead agencies.

Church schools need money. In fact, they need money so badly now that they have given the impression to the public that they have no other need. If relief is not provided them from the crisis of inflation, most church schools of America will be closed in a few years. These church schools alone remain certain bulwarks of moral and intellectual defence against the crusading evil philosophies of atheistic materialism current in our time. Thus, today the plea of distinctly christian educational institutions for support becomes actually a warning to the better element in the American public to take drastic steps to save its own skin. Certainly, the appeal of our schools is benevolent, but it even becomes a selfish motive now for men to give their money to them. We must invest in christian education to strengthen and nourish our souls, but let it be understood by all that we must also invest in it to save our shirts.

The great universities of Europe and Britain have made enormous contributions to the culture of the west and their names are world renowned. However, it has been the small college of America that has moulded the thinking of this country. Small colleges at the grass roots where education has been given in community patterns have created America's culture and more, they have infused into America's life a moral integrity and a passion for spiritual truth that no other country in the world has had. The small college is an American phenomenon. It may be no accident that the period of our national

spiritual anemia followed the period when our church colleges began to be overshadowed by big state institutions with big libraries and big laboratories and big football teams.

We do not conceive it to be the function of this committee to make analysis of educational institutions as is done for Synod and Assembly but to stimulate concern at the congregational level for this cause. We bring this report now to a close with several observations:

First, that our christian colleges are not facing an unsolvable problem. The solution is even now in the hands of our Presbyterian constituency. One step would be to provide money. With alcoholic beverages and tobacco claiming twelve billion dollars of our national income, there must be enough money to undergird the foundations of our republic. Another step would be to popularize attendance of our youth at our colleges.

Second, that church school teachers and sessions and other congregational leaders can build up in every congregation a sense of responsibility to our colleges and of pride in their existence, encouraging attendance of students and the establishing of memorials, either large or small.

Third, that inflationary costs, plus a long trend toward increasing expenses to meet education association requirements, have made most of our own church schools cost more than students can afford. Serious consideration must be given by our leaders to the fact that many of our most promising youth cannot afford education under the influence of their own church.

Fourth, that our Synod has too many colleges. Originally they were needed because facilities for communication were poor. Today most of them are not filled partly for lack of congregational interest. Even so, there are too many to finance, because interest gets sliced into such small portions. The educational problems of our Church call for the best study and thinking our entire membership can devote to the cause.

The report on Special Causes was presented by the chairman of the committee, Rev. W. H. Goodman, Jr. The report was adopted as follows:

SPECIAL CAUSES

I. THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The American Bible Society is commended for the excellent services in making available the Bible for distribution among people all over the world. At the last meeting of General Assembly a recommendation was adopted requesting the National Council of Churches to give the American Bible Society permission to print cheap copies of the Revised Standard Version of the New Testament.

II. HISTORICAL FOUNDATION.

The budget for the Historical Foundation for the coming year

has been set at \$19,650. During the last fiscal year the total receipts were \$17,430; disbursements \$16,020; balance \$1,409.

III. MONTREAT.

\$750,000 has been spent during the last five years on improvements at Montreat. A long range development program has been launched under the direction of Mr. John P. Williams which will conserve and develop the natural, cultural and spiritual life of Montreat. May 31, 1953 has been designated as Montreat Day; and it is asked that wherever advisable on that designated day an offering be received for Montreat. An overture by the Montreat board of directors made to the last General Assembly, asking the assembly to provide a minimum of \$75,000 a year for the support of Montreat was answered in the negative.

IV. STILLMAN COLLEGE.

As of April 1, 1952, Stillman College became a cause under the General Fund of the General Assembly. We are urged to see that it gets the full amount appropriated by the assembly. The General Assembly has approved a campaign for two million dollars for Presbyterian Negro work in the assembly. One million is to go to Stillman College, and one million is to go for Sunday school extension among Negroes. Headquarters for this campaign will be in Atlanta, Ga. Chaplain Major Richard R. Potter is to head this campaign, the dates of which are January 1 through August 31, 1953. The raising of funds in local churches is to take place during May of 1953. In fairness to all other causes it is asked that no solicitation will be carried on in the local congregations until the month of May, 1953. In prosecuting this campaign, the following procedure is anticipated.

1. A quota plan will be used with each congregation free to raise its amount in its own way.
2. A Treasurer will be designated to handle campaign funds with the necessary bonding and other legal safeguards provided.
3. The sixteen Synods will be organized into four divisions with each division having a Lay, Minister, and a Woman's Chairman.
4. The divisional chairmen will set up the organizations in each Synod and the same pattern will be carried on through Presbytery to each local church.
5. An experienced and nationally recognized fund raising firm will be employed to furnish professional advice.

The first \$75,000 of the Women of the Church Birthday Offering of 1952 will go toward the endowment of a Chair of Bible at Stillman College.

The Stillman financial report for the year ending June 30th, 1951 is as follows: Income, \$277,671.72; Expense, \$235,697.06.

V. LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE

For the support of this cause, the Treasurer of Inter-church Agencies appropriated \$936.37 for the year ending March 31, 1952.

VI. ASSEMBLY'S TRAINING SCHOOL.

Debt free building construction, high enrollment, outstanding gifts and legacies have served to highlight a successful year at the assembly's training school. Outstanding among the gifts and legacies were: gift from the W. W. Williamson estate of Danville, Va., which totalled \$225,899.52, and a legacy of Harvey C. Wise of Lexington, Va., of more than ninety five thousand dollars to the Martin Ryerson Turnbull Endowment Fund to which gifts from alumnae were added, bringing this fund to more than one hundred seventeen thousand dollars.

Pastors and sessions are urged to observe Training School Day on April 26, 1953 in order to acquaint local congregations with the service the school is rendering, the opportunities it offers young christians, and its needs.

At the end of the last church year, the funds of the training school counted a surplus balance of \$6,067.06.

Dr. Harold J. Dudley, Executive Secretary of the Synod of N. C., was presented to Presbytery in order that he might speak relative to the survey now being made of the rural and town churches of the Synod under the direction of Dr. Ralph A. Felton. Thanks of the Presbytery were tendered to Dr. Dudley for his explanation of this questionnaire and survey.

Presbytery recessed for lunch to reconvene at 2:00 p.m.

With the singing of the hymn, "The Church's One Foundation" and prayer by the Rev. S. M. Houck, Presbytery was reconvened at 2:00 p.m.

The Rev. C. H. Trueblood of Warsaw was presented to Presbytery in order that he might give information of the Christian Rural Overseas Program. Presbytery endorsed the C. R. O. P. organization and urged the full participation of the churches of the Presbytery in the gathering of commodities this fall.

The chairman of the Committee on Candidates, the Rev. W. H. Allison presented to Presbytery Messrs. Jerry C. McCann, Fletcher C. Hutcheson, and Samuel N. Thomas as candidates for licensure and ordination. They were admitted to examination.

Mr. Allison reported that the Theses of the three, and their written Exegesis had been read by him, and recommended that they be approved as satisfactory. Presbytery adopted this recommendation.

The examinations in Experimental Religion were conducted by Rev. C. B. Craig and were sustained as satisfactory. The Examinations in Theology were conducted by Rev. B. F. Rev. B. E. Dotson reported that calls for the services of the Licentiates were in his hands and found satisfactory by the commission. These are as follows: Jerry C. McCann to serve Wrightsville Beach and Oak Grove Chapels under the direction of the Home Mission Committee, Samuel N. Thomas to serve the White Plains church, Fletcher C. Rev. M. G. Stimson, Director of the Pioneer Camps, reported excellent camps, with an attendance of 165 Pioneers and 15 adult leaders. The report was received as information.

Reports on forthcoming Standard Leadership Schools were made by Rev. J. A. Nisbet for the Wallace area, by Rev. F. T. Read for the Whiteville area, and by Rev. S. M. Houck for the Wilmington area. The reports were received as information and the committees commended for their good work.

S. N. Thomas welcomed Presbytery to the White Plains church, after which the following were introduced to Presbytery and invited to sit as visiting brethren:

Rev. Marshall S. Woodson, of Fayetteville Presbytery; Rev. B. F. Ormond, of Pee Dee Presbytery; Rev. Hubert J. Kaylor, of East Hanover Presbytery, and Rev. John Fidler, of East Alabama Presbytery.

Also introduced to Presbytery were: Mr. Dallas Smith of the Board of Education in Richmond, and Mr. Roger W. Decker of Flora Macdonald College. Ruling Elders attending Presbytery for the first time were presented by their pastors and welcomed by the moderator.

The docket prepared by the stated clerk was presented and amended, after which it was adopted as the docket of Presbytery.

The following communications were read, and referred to appropriate committees:

A letter of transfer from East Hanover Presbytery for the Rev. Hubert J. Kaylor to the committee on examination of candidates. Copies of the proposed changes in the Book of Church Order, to a committee composed of the commissioners to the last meeting of the General Assembly, with the Rev. W. L. Foley as chairman. A petition from King's Chapel asking that they be organized into a church, referred to the committee on Church Extension. A letter from the board of Annuities and Relief relative to the Group Life Insurance Plan was received as information.

A special order was permitted to Rev. Priestley Conyers that he might present to Presbytery the importance of the new housing developments in the Cherry Point area of the Presbytery. The report was received as information.

The committee on a "Church and Manse Builders League" reported through Mr. L. N. Boney, Jr., recommending that such a league be formed, that members be enrolled on a voluntary basis, that calls be limited to two each year and that the minimum call be for \$2.00, all calls to be for some specific project in the Presbytery approved by the Home Missions committee, and the treasurer of Presbytery to act as treasurer of the fund.

The committee, composed of Rev. Robert L. McBeth, Fred E. Little, Humphrey Marshall, and Mr. Boney was commended for the work in planning for this league.

President Marshall S. Woodson of Flora Macdonald College was presented to Presbytery and he in turn presented Mr. Dallas H. Smith of the Board of Education who spoke to Presbytery relative to the Vocational Guidance Center now in operation at Flora Macdonald College under the direction of Mr. Roger W. Decker. After Mr. Smith had concluded his remarks Mr. Decker spoke of the center, and of its usefulness to young people in the churches of the Presbytery. The center was approved, and all churches and pastors were urged to make full use of its services.

The committee on Stewardship made its report through the chairman, Dr. William Crowe. The report was adopted and is as follows:

STEWARDSHIP RECOMMENDATIONS

October 14, 1952

The Council of Synod has apportioned to the Presbytery of Wilmington the sum of \$93,728 for the abbreviated nine months year, April 1 to December 31, 1953. The figure includes \$38,139 for Synod causes, and \$55,589 for Assembly Causes. Presbytery Causes, including \$7,580 for administration, and \$25,266 for our own missions, or \$32,846, added to the apportionment from Synod, equals \$126,329. The membership of Presbytery, 11,382, divided into the total proposed budget for the short year, proposes a required per capita giving of \$11.10 for the period. If this were calculated on an annual basis, the per capita figure would be \$14.78. Last year our per capita giving to benevolences was \$13.47; or, calculated for 9 months, it was \$10.11. We are being asked to give approximately 10% more to budget benevolences than we gave to all benevolence causes last year, including special offerings. However, the proposed budget includes only percentage figures. It is estimated that our proposed budget, involving per capita pledges of \$11.10 for the nine months, is approximately 55% greater than the per capita pledges we sought in the EMC of March, 1952. We should recognize that many individuals give several times the Presbytery's per capita, others give less, or nothing. The combination of all of these shows our Presbytery average.

Synod's Council is hoping to bring our Presbytery to the per capita level of the other Presbyteries. A similar increase was asked last year, but declined by Presbytery's Council. This year the Council decided to accept the apportionment and work toward the goal. Surely, there is no person in any congregation who could not give \$11.10 to benevolences in 9 months. If we should establish that as our minimum, Presbytery would go far beyond the increase now asked.

The formula for arriving at the "askings" for each congregation is: (1) The per capita for Presbytery, multiplied by the congregation's membership on April 1, 1952; (2) The average of benevolence giving by the congregation for three years; (3) These two figures added together and divided by 2 equals congregational apportionment. This

formula left a margin of \$4,282, which has been divided and assigned as follows: St. Andrews-Covenant and Wilmington First, each \$1,241; Wallace and Graves Memorial, each \$500; Westminster and Clarkton, each \$400.

The following standing committees were announced by the Moderator: Leave of Absence: W. B. Hood, R. L. Turner, and Ruling Elder Paul Jordan. Resclution: S. W. Hogue, J. A. Nisbet, and Ruling Elder N. J. Owens. Place and Time of Next Meeting: M. G. Stimson, N. P. Farrior and A. F. Wells.

Presbytery took recess until 1:30 after being led in prayer by the Moderator.

Presbytery reconvened at 1:30 p.m., and was opened with prayer by Rev. J. A. Nisbet. The Stewardship committee was authorized to set up a schedule of Stewardship meetings in the churches of the Presbytery to explain in detail the financial goals of the Presbytery, and to discuss the stewardship program of the local church.

The following motion made by Rev. W. P. Conyers, III, was adopted:

That the Presbytery exhort every church in the Presbytery to insure that the recommendations of Presbytery be read to the members of the session and the board of deacons of each church at the first meeting following the Presbytery meetings, and that this fact be recorded in the session minutes. That the Committee on Sessional Records be asked to insure that this reading and its record be present in the Sessional Minutes upon each inspection thereof.

That sufficient funds be made available to provide for the expeditious mimeographing and mailing of Presbytery's recommendations not more than one week after each meeting.

The Rev. J. D. Withrow reported for the Committee on Homes, and the report was adopted and is as follows:

THE PRESBYTERIAN HOME

The Board of Trustees of Presbyterian Homes, Inc., reports that it has secured Mr. Richard A. Short as business manager and superintendent of the home. He in turn has secured a well trained and efficient staff to operate the home. This staff consists of a hostess, two trained nurses and an office secretary.

On December 6, 1951 the board of trustees formally accepted the remodeling job done by the contractor. On Sunday, January 6, 1952 dedicatory services were held with the Rev. C. M. Gibbs giving the principal address. On January 21, 1952 the home received its first member. Since then 19 other persons have been admitted.

The total cost of additions, alterations, and repairs to the present building was \$91,239.48. The total cost of furnishings was \$35,999.90. These funds for furnishings were provided by various groups and individuals. Audits show a net worth of \$404,337.83.

Preliminary plans for a much needed second unit of the home has been approved. To meet this need the board has requested Synod

the authority to raise \$500,000. The second unit will take care of approximately 60 members.

WILLIAM BLACK HOME

The William Black Home reports an indebtedness of \$4,000. In the past year it has paid in full an indebtedness of \$8,500.00.

Excellent board and comfortable rooms have been furnished Home Mission workers and Presbyterians of N. C., from six to ten dollars per week cheaper than similar accommodations elsewhere in Montreat.

The Women-of-the-Synod under the efficient leadership of Mrs. Julian B. Hutaff, Jr., and her committee, have completed the furnishings of the home in a most attractive and comfortable manner at a cost of \$19,000.00. From ten to twelve thousand dollars more is needed to enlarge the kitchen and dining room, construct a large pantry, complete the drainage and paving system and build servant quarters.

PRESBYTERIAN ORPHAN HOME

Barium Springs

The Regents of The Presbyterian Orphans Home report that the general health and well-being of the children has been good.

The school under the direction of R. G. Calhoun, received the highest rating of any Iredell County school in a special study made by the state last year.

The buildings on the campus are in a fair state of repair and have received the rating of excellent from the county health department. The home has been put to a great deal of expense in the establishment of a central heating plant and steam line. This past summer it was necessary to lay a completely new steam line at a contract cost not to exceed \$76,000.00. It looks as if the Regents might have to borrow money in order to complete this job.

The Iredell County health department issued an ultimatum requiring the home to pasteurize its milk for the sake of the safety of the children. The erection of a plant with its equipment will cost \$15,000.00.

The income of the home from the churches of the Synod reached an all-time high this year. The Thanksgiving offering was \$92,924.80. The regular offerings totaled \$87,014.73. The income from the churches has enabled the home to operate the whole year without a deficit.

The report of the committee on Evangelism was made by the Rev. M. C. MacQueen and was received as information. The recommendation that each church in the Presbytery have a visitation evangelism program between this and the spring meeting of Presbytery was adopted.

The minutes of the commission to ordain and install Rev. F. C. Hutcheson as pastor of the Tabor City church were read and admitted to record, and are as follows:

A letter from East Hanover Presbytery dismissing the Rev. Hubert J. Kaylor was read, and Mr. Kaylor was admitted to examination. The examination on Experimental Religion was conducted by the Rev. C. B. Craig and was sustained as satisfactory. The examination on views in theology was conducted by the Rev. B. Frank Hall and was

sustained as satisfactory. The examination on Sacraments and Church Government was conducted by the Rev. W. L. Foley and was sustained as satisfactory. The examination as a whole was sustained as satisfactory, and Mr. Kaylor was enrolled as a member of Wilmington Presbytery upon his signing of the minister's obligation. Mr. Kaylor is to serve as assistant pastor of the St. Andrews-Covenant Presbyterian Church of Wilmington.

The committee on the building of a church at Wrightsville Beach reported that its work was completed, and asked to be discharged. Presbytery by a standing vote expressed to the committee thanks for work well done. The committee was authorized to turn over to the treasurer of Presbytery all books and monies now on hand, and the treasurer was authorized to spend a sum not to exceed \$300 for any further incidental expenses that may be incurred. The committee was discharged.

The Sunday school superintendents of the Presbytery were reminded of the conference for superintendents to be held in the Wallace church on October 26th, and invited to attend this meeting.

Dr. J. O. Mann of Mecklenburg Presbytery was introduced to Presbytery and invited to sit as a visiting brother. Dr. Mann spoke of some coming programs in the Synod and urged attendance at these.

Rev. P. L. Clark reported for the committee on Sessional Records, and presented the following recommendations which were adopted:

I. RULES FOR KEEPING SESSIONAL RECORDS

1—The time and place of the meeting, the names of members present, the name of the Moderator, should be given. It should be stated that the meeting was, or was not, opened and closed with prayer.

2—The Minutes should record Baptisms, members received and dismissed, motions and resolutions passed, reports adopted, Ordination and Installation of Elders and Deacons, actions of the Session in any cases of discipline, election of representatives to Synod and Presbytery.

3—The annual statistical report of the Session to Presbytery should be recorded in full, and read before the congregation.

4—Mention should be made that the representatives to Synod and Presbytery made reports to the Session.

5—It should be recorded that the proceedings of the Board of Deacons are examined annually.

6—It should be recorded that books of all treasurers of funds have been examined annually.

7—The records should indicate that the Minutes of the Session were approved by the Session preceding the Spring Meeting of Presbytery.

8—The following should be recorded in the Minutes as information, but not as part of the proceedings of the Session:

a—The Minutes of Congregational Meetings:

b—Matters of historical interest: installation of Pastor, dedications of buildings, etc.

9—The Sessional Records should be submitted to the Presbytery at its spring meeting each year.

II. That the following blank be provided for guidance of the examiners of Sessional record books:

A communication from the division of Negro Work, of the Board of Church Extension, was read, the subject matter being the forthcoming campaign in behalf of Negro Work and Stillman college. The communication was received as information.

A communication from Dr. E. C. Scott, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, informing Presbytery that the nine months church year is to be interpreted as a full year so far as the General Assembly's office is concerned, was received as information. A second communication from Dr. Scott pointed out that Wilmington Presbytery could be entitled to 8 rather than 6 commissioners to the General Assembly to convene in June. This was received as information.

The Committee on Church Extension made its report. Pending the adoption of the report Presbytery heard Mr. Fred Little in a special order of the day, relative to the Church and Manse Assistance Fellowship. The report was adopted.

THE DIVISION OF HOME MISSIONS

All aid-receiving churches of the Presbytery have had the full-time services of pastors during the year with the exception of Chinquapin and Bethel. These churches have been without a pastor for more than two years. At the present time they have a pastor on call.

Three new pastorates were formed during the year: Acme-White Plains, Tabor City, Chapel on the Boardwalk, Oak Grove Chapel. Woodburn church, formerly grouped with Acme, now has the services of Rev. J. D. Withrow for all of his time.

New work was begun in Havelock, adjacent to the Cherry Point Marine Air Base, in November. Miss Mildred Mallard, extension worker for the Synod, has given full time to this work since the first of October and now has a Sunday School with classes for all ages and preaching services every Sunday morning. The Church Extension Committee of the Assembly has made an appropriation of \$10,000 toward a building and an additional \$4,000, or as much of that amount as may be needed, for a building site. The Synod's Church Extension Committee has made an appropriation of \$5,000 toward a building. A committee is now seeking a suitable location for the building.

Two chapels were organized into churches during the year: The Chapel on the Boardwalk and Oak Grove Chapel.

The new brick church and educational building at Brunswick has been completed and is now in use. Antioch, Stanford and Topsail have added Sunday School rooms to their buildings during the year.

Delgado church has been thoroughly renovated. The Chinquapin manse has undergone reconditioning and had a central heating plant installed.

Five pastorates, embracing nine churches, have assumed full self-support during the year: Carolina Beach-Myrtle Grove, under the leadership of Rev. Jack W. Ware; Beulaville-Antioch, under the leadership of Rev. Walter H. Goodman, Jr.; Grove-Hallsville, under the leadership of Rev. J. T. Hayter; Jacksonville, under the leadership of the supply pastor, Rev. Herbert Meza, Topsail-Delgado, under the leadership of Rev. Thos. B. Ruff.

A manse for the Acme-White Plains field is under construction. This project received a grant-in-aid in the amount of \$8,000.00. The Presbytery retains the title to this property. Other grants-in-aid made during the year are: Brunswick church \$500.00, Garland Church \$500.00, Tabor City Manse \$500.00, Woodburn manse repairs \$300.00, Chinquapin manse repairs \$1,333.00, Black River educational building \$500.00.

Salary supplements were paid to 23 pastors in the aggregate sum of \$13,530.57 for the nine months period, April 1, 1952 - December 31, 1952.

A total of \$2,755.65 has been paid out for repairs and upkeep of property owned by the Presbytery during the nine months period, April 1, 1953 - December 31, 1953.

The Church and Manse Assistance Fellowship, authorized by the Presbytery and promoted by the Home Missions Committee is meeting with gratifying response. On the basis of pledges received to day, this fellowship bids fair to yield gifts of not less than \$3,000 per year for grants-in-aid.

THE DIVISION OF EVANGELISM

Believing that evangelism is the primary and principal function of the church and that evangelism needs to be kept Christ-centered, the committee submits its report.

The committee calls to the attention of the ministers and elders of each church the recommendation which was adopted at the October meeting, that "each church in the Presbytery have a visitation evangelism program between this (October) and the spring meeting of Presbytery". Along with this recommendation the committee offered assistance to any church needing help in their visitation evangelism program.

We recommend:

1. That each local congregation be urged through its session to appoint a Committee on Evangelism.
2. That each church set aside certain months for evangelistic emphasis.
3. That the ministry and officers of the church be invited to join the covenant of prayer entered into by more than five hundred ministers of our denomination in which thirty minutes a day is set apart for personal meditation and communion, fifteen minutes of which is offered in intercessory prayer.
4. That, where convenient, our delegates to the General Assembly attend the Pre-Assembly Conference on Evangelism.

5. That pastors and sessions be urged to make use of Communicant Classes as a very productive method of evangelistic endeavor.
6. That all sessions follow up their members who have moved away: (a) by writing pastors in the community in which the member has moved, and, (b) reporting such Presbyterians who have moved away to the stated clerk at each regular meeting of Presbytery, that such information may be forwarded to the division of evangelism.
7. That all church members be asked to have a prayer list of inactive members and non-church members and to pray often for these persons.

CHRISTIAN RELATIONS

The principal matters covered under this heading in the Assembly reports and minutes are covered by separate committees in this Presbytery, especially notable those concerning marriage and divorce and Sabbath and family religion.

The term, "Christian Relations", however, is so general that there is no part of any Christian's relations with his fellow man that is not included under this head. Let us think of two fields in which this general application is of the greatest importance: the economic and the political.

Many years ago Dr. Ogden, in an address on employer-employee relationships, quoted the salutation of Boaz to his reapers and their response (Ruth 2:4) as representing the mutual regard for each other that obtained between that ancient man and his hired workers, and he pointed out that when this spirit motivates the relations between Labor and Capital a just and happy solution to their problems is assured. The same may be said of the relations between landlords who rent dwellings and apartments and their tenants, between farmers and share-croppers; between time merchants and credit customers. It is a happy fact to contemplate that in numerous conspicuous cases, and in no one knows how many obscure cases, such relationships are characterized by the mutual love and esteem of Christians. There are, however, occasional complaints voiced, and sometimes many such.

Some Presbyterians sometimes express concern and deep regret that our church seems unable to reach as many of the tenant-employee groups of our neighbors as we should. To some our church is very largely a class church. It might be relevant to ask if one reason the tenant so often does not attend the church his landlord attends is some unconfessed feeling that the relations between them is not wholly up to the standard that mutual Christian love requires. This question should not be asked with reference to only one party, but to both. This is a question that requires caution in its asking, for there are many valid reasons with no intimation of fault that cause men to attend different churches. Still every Christian's conscience should be clear on this point.

In the political field we do not consider it the business of the church to enter politics; but we cannot have a Christian national order unless men take their duties as citizens and as public officials as Christian relations with their fellowmen. Faithfulness in the performance of civic duties is a Christian virtue, and an accession to office is a trust, not a trophy.

It is hardly conceivable that the three most significant revolutions in modern history, all of them within nominally Christian nations, could ever have occurred, if Christianity had seriously dominated the relations between all groups concerned. I refer to the Russian Communist Revolution, the French Revolution, and the American Revolution. What sort of a world would we have today, if Christian relations had prevented those revolutions?

NEGRO WORK

The Committee on Negro Work in our Presbytery, in conjunction with a committee of the First Church, Wilmington, invited Rev. Lawrence Bottoms, Assistant Director of Negro Work of the Board of Church Extension, to come to Wilmington for a survey of the needs and opportunities for additional religious work among the Negroes of that city. Mr. Bottoms came to Wilmington in November and made a survey. At the conclusion of the survey he made a report to the committee of the First Presbyterian church and recommended work for Negroes in the South Side of Wilmington, using temporarily the building formerly used by the Queen Street Mission but with the view of locating later on a site between the Hillcrest and Jervay Housing Projects. The committee now has this recommendation before it.

At the present time no work is being done among Negroes by the Presbytery church, U. S., within the boundaries of our Presbytery.

DEFENSE SERVICE DEPARTMENT

"Maintaining the Tie" between the church and her servicemen and women at home and overseas is the task of the Defense Service Department of the Division of Home Missions. During the past year the number of our ministers serving as full-time chaplains increased from 40 to 52. Today these men are our church extension representatives in Korea, Japan, Okinawa, Midway, Canal Zone, Germany, and on the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, as well as in the four corners of the continental United States. In addition to these chaplains on active duty, we have 8 part-time chaplains working in the Veterans Administration hospitals and 154 among the reserve components of our Armed Forces.

The Defense Service Department of the Assembly receives many requests for additional workers and building aid from churches adjacent to camp areas. Most of these cannot be met because of inadequate funds. However, Jacksonville and Cherry Point, within the bounds of our Presbytery, have received grants-in-aid amounting to \$10,000 and \$5,000 respectively. Yet, more help is needed if we are to adequately meet the challenge. Jacksonville has been declared to be the finest opportunity in America. Cherry Point is equally as good.

The churches of our Presbytery should note that support of the Assembly's Defense Service Department is no longer in the percentage budget, and is entirely dependent on the Special offering taken on Mother's Day.

RADIO

It is pleasing to note that our ministers in the Wilmington Presbytery are participating in morning devotionals at all stations in the Presbytery. It is equally as gratifying that all of the stations in the Presbytery are willing to carry "Presbytery meditations" over their

stations. It has been necessary to contact some of these stations personally, in order to secure this cooperation, since there are so many demands for the stations' time.

Presbyterian services are being broadcast on Sundays over several of the stations, and the cooperation of the management of all stations has been most gratifying.

It is recommended that Presbyterian laymen participate more frequently in conducting radio programs and not lay the entire burden upon our ministers. We have a number of laymen in the Presbytery who are not only qualified, but are entirely willing to participate in such programs.

Presbytery authorized its committee on Home Missions to borrow the sum of \$7,500 for the purpose of constructing a dwelling in Reigelwood to be used as a manse for the pastor who now serves the Acme church;

Instructed its trustees, Joshua S. James, James H. Clark, and Walter P. Sprunt, to sign a note for the amount of \$7,500 in favor of the Board of Church Extension, Presbyterian Church, U. S., and instructed its trustees named above to issue a deed of trust on real estate located at 209 N. 13th Street, Wilmington, New Hanover County, N. C., in favor of the Board of Church Extension, Presbyterian Church, U. S., and to give this as security for the above note.

Presbytery engaged in a season of prayer for God to give guidance and strength to the administration of the new president of the United States, his cabinet, and all officers of government in our land and in the world. The prayers were led by the Rev. B. F. Hall, the Rev. R. L. McBath, and the Rev. M. J. McChesney.

The Rev. M. C. MacQueen took the chair.

The report of the committee on World Missions and Inter-church Aid was given by the chairman, the Rev. D. A. Bowles, and was adopted.

WORLD MISSIONS

The Committee on World Missions submits the following report:

1. A Word about Each of Our Fields

Congo—The phenomenal development of our work in the Congo, conspicuous for many years, continues with an every-increasing acceleration. Indeed, this very progress constitutes in a sense our major embarrassment. Ten central stations, with their inter-related programs of evangelistic, educational, medical, social, and industrial activities reaching into more than a thousand villages, have taxed the capacities of our missionaries to the utmost. The task that confronts the Mission is all but staggering in its dimensions.

Mexico—The keynote of our Mexico work is expressed in the word "Pioneering". A glance at the towns and cities occupied by our

missionaries shows many new places, indicating that we are leaving the better established centers for areas hitherto unreached. It is this policy that has prompted our Mexico Mission to sound its urgent call for additional evangelistic workers. Scores of towns and villages lie untouched by the Gospel.

Brazil—Probably the most significant aspect of our work in Brazil is the growth and development of the National Presbyterian Church. The year 1959 will mark the centennial of Presbyterianism in that country. In no other nation of South America has the impact of Protestantism been felt so strongly. Whereas the census of 1940 indicated only two percent of the population as Protestant, the 1950 census lists the Protestant strength at eight percent. Brazil is beginning to question the validity and the worth-whileness of her old spiritual foundations.

Formosa—From one of our missionaries in Formosa comes this word,

“In our many years on the mission field we have never seen a field more ripe for the sowing and reaping for the Kingdom of God.”

Then, in speaking of the refugees from the Mainland, he says,

“There are 1,500,000 of them away from their homes and many of them have lost all worldly belongings. They are away from the non-Christian religions which usually bound them to their homes in China—they are free from customs which would prevent them from becoming Christians. Hence, among these lonely and discouraged people the Gospel finds a ready response. The big problem which is facing the missionaries and the Formosan Presbyterian Church is how to teach and absorb these many new believers from the Mainland.”

Japan—The outstanding characteristic of our work in Japan today as contrasted with the pre-war days is to be seen in the eagerness with which the people respond to the Christian life and message. Where indifference and scanty attendance broke the hearts of the missionaries of the earlier days, the problem of our workers in the present situation is to meet the demands of a population which for the first time is seriously investigating the claims of Christianity.

Korea—Throughout the U. N. zone in Korea the churches are alive and active. It is no exaggeration to say that Southern Korea is more nearly saturated with Christian activity than it has ever been. Hundreds of thousands of refugees, many of them Christians, are concentrated in the southern fringe of the peninsula and on some of the islands that lie off the coast. Word comes to us of the organization of scores of new churches, and converts even from among the Communist prisoners. Our four chief centers of work are all open and occupied, and from these points a missionary program of surprising proportions is being projected into the outlying country districts. In the territory occupied by our Mission alone, there are nearly a thousand active Presbyterian churches and congregations.

2. Our Missionary Needs.

Thirty-two new missionaries were commissioned at the service closing the World Mission Conference in Montreat this year. Most of them are now on the field. Some have expressed the judgment that this is as fine a group as has ever been sent out by our Church.

However, missionaries are still needed to do the job which has been given us in eight foreign countries. The greatest need is for evangelistic missionaries. There is urgent need for ordained ministers in Africa, Brazil, Mexico, Japan, and Korea.

3. Overseas Relief and Inter-church Aid.

The Department of Overseas Relief and Inter-church Aid continues its service of love and mercy in war-torn countries. Material and spiritual aid has been sent to Korea, Palestine, and Europe. The Reformed Church in Europe has been strengthened by aid given to four theological seminaries. Cooperation with and participation in the programs of the World Council of Churches, Church World Service, and CROP have made possible a varied and important ministry to refugees and churches.

Support for this Department shows a slight increase over last year. The Easter offering, 1952, amounted to \$51,500.00, an increase of \$6,500.00. In addition, the basic sum of \$115,000.00 is allocated to this work from benevolent contributions to World Missions. The total, \$166,500.00, falls far short of meeting the tremendous needs.

4. Financial Situation.

The total receipts for the period from April 1st, 1952, through August 31st, showed a net increase of \$79,157.90 over the same period of a year ago.

However, attention is called to the fact that it is not sufficient to cover the increase in the Board's spending budget for the current church year. This was enlarged by the order of the General Assembly; and due to the expansion of the work and its higher cost a still larger increase will be necessary to meet the budget requirement for the year.

Our Lord saw the needy multitudes and had compassion on them. "Then saith He unto his disciples, The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few." In other words He summoned them to see the need and to manifest the same compassion. Then follows the two-fold command: Pray—Go (Matthew 10:1, 7, 8). If the church can see the need and have something of the mind of Christ, obedience will follow. The response of the churches is in proportion to the vision of the ministers.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- (1) That the ministers and churches of our Presbytery constantly present the challenge of World Missions to young people considering full time Christian service, reminding them of the ever increasing need for new missionaries.
- (2) That every church in the Presbytery, with its organization, be asked to observe January 25 to February 1, 1953 as the Week of Prayer and Self-Denial for World Missions; and that all Sessions be urged to arrange for supplemental offerings in the churches.
- (3) That all churches, societies, and individuals assume wherever possible definite responsibility for definite parts of the World Mission Work.
- (4) That the fullest possible use be made of furloughed missionaries as speakers and leaders in our churches—not only during the World Mission season but throughout the entire year.

- (5) That our pastors and churches be urged to keep before their members the great need for material and spiritual help in war-torn areas of the world.
- (6) That collections of used clothing, blankets, et cetera, be made by churches at least twice a year, designated as contributions from the Presbyterian Church, U. S., and sent to Church World Service, New Windsor, Maryland.
- (7) That attention be drawn to the Easter offering for Overseas Relief and Inter-church Aid, April 5, 1953, as authorized by the General Assembly, and all Sessions be urged to arrange for its observance.

Dr. J. M. Waggett made the report for the committee on Sabbath and Family Religion which was adopted and is as follows:

At one time Robert Burns wrote,

"The power incensed, the pageant will desert
The pomous strain, the sacerdotal stole;
But haply, in some cottage far apart,
May hear, well pleased, the language of the soul
And in His book of Life the inmates poor enroll."

In these later years, the pageant is with us. It has imposed its presence upon our social structure, and we see it stealing much of the time once given to the Sabbath worship hour and the religious ritual of the home.

In spite of this we can observe in our midst a growing spiritual consciousness, a search for spiritual guidance and an interpretation of religion which may yield a richer human experience and a greater sense of reality that was the heritage of much of the past.

The Rev. W. L. Foley reported for the committee on Nominations. The report was amended. Presbytery re-elected its trustees to educational institutions whose terms expire at this meeting of Presbytery, and adopted the remainder of the report of the committee on Nominations, which is as follows:

Dr. B. Frank Hall presented the report from the committee on Religious Education.

The committee on Education reports a full program of activities during the past year. A most successful Senior Y. P. Conference was held at Flora McDonald College in June, and for the first time two weeks of Pioneer Camp made possible the attendance of many more Pioneers than in previous years. Vacation Bible schools were held in churches throughout the Presbytery in the summer, and a comprehensive program of leadership education, with schools in each of three major areas of the Presbytery, were held during the fall and winter, bringing the opportunity for training in reach of every church. These schools were all remarkably well attended and very successful. A project to provide audio-visual aids and counsel has been undertaken under the leadership of Rev. Jack Ware, and we are still attempting to increase this valuable service. Men's work in the Presbytery went forward under the able leadership of Mr. Dallas Herring. Details of this work, as well as plans for the other departments in the coming year, will be presented verbally to Presbytery for approval as a part of this report.

There are still churches in the Presbytery which have not availed themselves of the help provided for the training of DVBS teachers through the Institute held annually in May, or of the services of trained leaders who can be secured to assist in the organization of schools. We urge that every church in the Presbytery undertake a school this summer, and that workers be prepared through participation in the DVBS Institute which will be announced as part of this report.

We recommend further that pastors and sessions encourage young people of Senior and Pioneer age to attend the appropriate conference or camp, and that churches endeavor to provide aid, where possible, in defraying the expense of such attendance.

Third, we commend to all the churches the expanding program of leadership education in the Presbytery, and invite the help and advice of pastors, sessions and church school workers in making this vital program more effective.

Fourth, we call to the attention of pastors and sessions the need of more adequate organization in local churches of Men's Groups, Young People, and Pioneer Fellowship, and urge that such organizations be encouraged and instructed to use the organization and program provided by the General Assembly's committee.

Millard Stimpson reported that the Pioneer camp is being directed by him and Rev. J. A. Nisbet. The dates of the camp are July 20-25, cost the same as last year (\$13.00), to be held at Lake Singletary.

An error in this account was brought to the attention of the Presbytery by Mr. Taylor. Permission to receive this as a verbal report, and for an audit to be made, and a final report given at the July meeting was granted.

The following information was given on the Church and Manse Fellowship: 577 pledges received to date with \$1,930.00 per call.

The moderator announced the following Standing Committees:

Leave of Absence: The Revs. W. B. Hood, N. P. Farrior, and Ruling Elder J. S. Kellogg.

Bills and Overtures: The Revs. D. A. Bowles, J. W. Miller, L. C. Tucker.

Resolution of Thanks: The Revs. J. A. Nisbet, F. C. Hutcheson, J. M. Waggett, and Ruling Elder Norwood Bender.

Time and Place of Next Meeting: The Revs. M. G. Stimpson, A. K. Dudley, and W. F. F. Little.

Added to the Committee on Audits: Ruling Elders R. C. Platt, Jr., and T. J. Turner.

Rev. M. C. MacQueen was granted permission to present an overture relative to campaigns for funds in the church. The overture was referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

The report of the committee on the Campaign for Negro Work was presented. Rev. M. C. MacQueen gave his personal support to the campaign and explained the distribution of the two million dollars to be raised. He reminded the local churches that their goals had been received, and distributed literature on the campaign. Mr. MacQueen introduced Dr. Wm. Crowe, Jr., who gave an inspiring address on the great opportunity which is ours among the Negroes in our Southland. He told of the run-down state of Stillman Institute and gave convincing reasons for the great

need for trained Negro leadership today among the Negro people. Dr. Frank A. Haasis, Presbytery's lay-chairman in the Campaign for Negro Work, was presented and spoke briefly about the opportunity which is ours in this field. Mr. MacQueen also cited proposed work in Wilmington and other cities of North Carolina which would receive support from this campaign. This report was received as information.

Ruling Elder H. B. Kornegay gave the report of the committee to study Pastor's Salaries.

REPORT OF PRESBYTERY'S AD INTERIM COMMITTEE
TO STUDY SALARIES PAID TO PASTORS

The Ad Interim committee appointed at the January 1953 meeting of Wilmington Presbytery in conformity with Recommendation 13 in the Annual Report of Assembly's Committee on The Minister and His Work, as submitted to the 92nd General Assembly in June 1952 and reading as follows:

"That the special committees in Presbyteries study the salaries paid to pastors serving therein, and bring the matter to the attention of churches which fail to pay salaries adequate to meet the rise in the cost of living. It is suggested that laymen compose at least 75% of the membership of these committees",

presents herewith its report.

All appointees, consisting of two ministers and six laymen, accepted service on the committee.

Individual study of the subject was undertaken by the committee members, assisted by the Stated Clerk who also attended a meeting of the committee at which all members were present except one.

In exploring the background on which the recommendation of the Assembly's Committee on The Minister and His Work was based, recognition was taken of the statement made in its annual report reading as follows:

"It is expected that the laborer or the professional man will demand pay for his services. The pastor, on the other hand, is at the mercy of the church he serves. This mercy at times may be expressed so meagerly that the minister may wonder at God's purpose in calling him to serve such a church."

Further in its report Assembly's committee stated that, according to figures furnished by our Board of Annuities and Relief, the average annual cash salary of pastors in

the Assembly as of March 1952 was \$3,815, which represented an increase of 82% over 1941 as compared with an increase in the average income of wage earners in this country of 150%.

In this committee's consideration of the salaries of active pastors laboring in Wilmington Presbytery, published figures for the year ended March 31, 1952, were brought up to date by the Stated Clerk for the committee's consideration. This study developed that increases of an encouraging nature had been established during the past year by a substantial number of churches in the Presbytery, and that, almost without exception, salaries now paid are at least equal to the minimum scale heretofore adopted by our Home Mission committee of \$3,000 for unmarried ministers and \$3,300 for married ministers with families.

The committee expresses regret that there was not sufficient time between the January and April meetings of Presbytery in which to handle the subject directly with individual churches as might be deemed desirable, in conformity with that portion of recommendation of General Assembly's Committee on The Minister and His Work.

The committee submits the following findings and recommendations:

- (1) That salaries of pastors in Wilmington Presbytery were not maintained at adequate minimum basis in 1941;
- (2) That increases in such salaries within the past 12 years have not been commensurate with the increased cost of living;
- (3) That basis for minimum pastors' salaries be objectively set at \$3,300 per annum with living quarters for unmarried ministers, and \$3,600 with manse for married ministers with up to two children; and further, that churches, singly or in groups, give prayerful consideration to the setting of pastors' salaries higher than such minima;
- (4) That churches now assisted by Presbytery's Home Mission committee in the payment of pastors' salaries be urged to, as soon as and to the extent possible, relieve Presbytery of that burden so that additional funds may be available for further expansion of Home Mission Work in the Presbytery;
- (5) That Presbytery provide for further study and handling of the question of its pastors' salaries in the further light of information that will be made available from reports of churches for the year ended March 31, 1953; such handling to include contacts with Elders and Deacons of such churches that it may be felt should give prayerful consideration to the payment of more adequate compensation to its pastors.

The report was amended by the insertion of the word "compensation" for the word "salary" in Section 3. The report was adopted with this change.

The Rev. J. T. Hayter welcomed the Presbytery to the Hallsville Presbyterian church and informed the Presbytery of the arrangements for lunch. Presbytery recessed for lunch to reconvene at 2 p.m.

Presbytery reconvened at 2 p.m., with the singing of the hymn, "Jesus shall Reign", and a prayer by the Rev. M. J. McChesney.

The Rev. W. P. Conyers introduced Mrs. John Farrior of Burgaw, president of the Women of the Church, of Wilmington Presbytery, who brought greetings to the Presbytery from the Women of the Church and gave her report.

REPORT OF THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH

Mrs. John Farrior, President

In Clinton at Graves Memorial church more than 400 women convened for the 65th Annual Meeting of the Women of the Church of Wilmington Presbytery, April 16, 17. "In His Glad Service" was the theme and the theme verse, Mark 10:45—"For the Son of Man also came not to be served but to serve, and gave his life as a ransom for many." Inspirational speakers were: Miss Janie McCutchen, Director of Spiritual Growth, Board of Women's Work, Atlanta, Ga.; Mrs. Rufus D. Wilson, President of the Women of the Church, Synod of North Carolina; Mr. John E. Talmadge, missionary to Korea; Dr. William Crowe, Jr., and Dr. B. Frank Hall.

Three new groups have been organized: Delgado, Cherry Point, and the Little Chapel on the Boardwalk. 68 local presidents reported for 4,508 members who contributed \$29,379 to benevolences, \$14.954 to local churches making a grand total of \$44,333. This is an increase both in membership and in gifts. We have grown spiritually with an increase in daily Bible readers, in family worship, and in those studying in some Bible class. One of our greatest achievements both spiritually and financially is the raising of \$5,000.00, our share of the \$50,000 Endowment Fund for the Chair of Bible at Presbyterian Junior College. With vision and faith undergirded by prayer, this the largest special project ever assumed was accepted as a two year project last April. The generous and enthusiastic response in one year indicates that women stand ready to fight Communism on the only front open to us, that of Christian ideas with the greatest of all weapons, the Word of Life. "Heaven and earth shall pass but my words shall not pass away."

Facing up to one of our short-comings and looking toward all women of the church having a spiritual ministry in their homes and being strengthened for their responsibilities as Christian women, the Presbyterial recently in session adopted the following recommendation: "That every local Women of the Church group be called to set up a regular visitation program whereby the inactive women will be experiencing Christian fellowship with active church women."

Increased knowledge of our mission program was reflected in the number of schools for both Home and World missions, reading of study books, missionary speakers, and wide use of films. The 7 District Conferences had an attendance of 674; Synodical Training School 13; Montreat Women's Training School 12; 88 young people were assisted in attending their conferences; 10 delegates were sent to the Negro Women's Conference.

Rendering special service were 596 women working in Sunday schools, 464 in Vacation Bible schools, 110 as Youth Advisors. All locals contributed to the Birthday Offering a total of \$1,594.08; 57 contributed \$181 and doubled the quota of supplies to White Cross. No statistics can reveal or measure the many avenues of service of Presbyterian women beyond the planned program of the church. The Korean war lay on our hearts as we prayed daily, sent vitamins, layettes, money and candy for war orphans, and sewed weekly for the missionaries. The flood victims of Holland were remembered. Thousands of pounds of good used clothing were sent through Church World Service. In the community there was splendid work with other denominations, civic groups, Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets, school lunches, aid for the needy, a college fund for a student, Bible school on Saturday morning for young people; for the local church, cleaning, secretarial work, flowers, nursery, refreshments, meals for the Men of the Church and Youth Fellowship, family night suppers, repairs, furnishings, and donations for building.

These achievements are reported humbly with grateful acknowledgement of God's grace. The challenge for these crucial days is "let go, and let God", so that "In His Glad Service", we may take as our pattern Him who came NOT TO BE SERVED BUT TO SERVE.

The report was adopted.

Dr. B. F. Hall was granted permission to complete the report of the Committee on Christian Education. He introduced Ruling Elder Dallas Herring who reported on the work of the Men of the Church. He told that the goal is a Men's organization in every local church, and told of plans for a more complete organization on a Presbytery wide basis. Forms for information from local men's groups were distributed. Information on the Men's Conference at Montreat was given as to dates (June 19, 20, 21), registration, and program. The report was adopted.

The commission to revise the Manual of Presbytery had no report.

The commission to Install the Rev. T. O. Bird as pastor of Faison, Calypso, and Stanford gave its report:

The commission appointed by the Presbytery to install Rev. Taylor O. Bird as the pastor of the Calypso, Stanford and Faison churches met in the Colypso church on Sunday, March 1, at 10:45 a.m. Members present: Ministers B. E. Dotson and L. A. Taylor; Ruling Elders H. C. Brogden, A. P. Cates and Leon Flowers. The meeting was opened with prayer led by Leon Flowers. Elder Leon Flowers was

THE INSTALLATION OF REV. F. C. HUTCHESON

The commission appointed by Wilmington Presbytery to install the Rev. Fletcher C. Hutcheson as pastor of the Brunswick Presbyterian church met at the church on Sunday, February 1, 1953 at 7:15 p.m. The Rev. L. A. Taylor was chairman of the commission and the Rev. D. A. MEMORIAL TO REV. J. E. L. WINECOFF

Rev. John Eugene Winecoff, of Florence, S. C., honorably retired member of Wilmington Presbytery, died in Florence on February 15, 1953 after a brief illness. He was born in Cabarrus County, N. C., May 2, 1863. Mr. Winecoff studied in Davidson College and Union Theological Seminary of Richmond, Virginia, and was ordained in 1891 by Potosi Presbytery. Before his retirement from active service in 1932, he had served a number of churches in Missouri, North Carolina, and as a home mission worker in North Carolina. In the latter area he organized several new churches in Wilmington Presbytery. He was also for six years president of the James Sprunt Institute at that time located in Kenansville, N. C. He was the author of several books, including "The Catholic Religion and the Protestant Faith" (1947) and "False Churches and How They got That Way" (1949). Funeral services were held in the First Church, Florence, with Rev. James E. Cousar, Jr., officiating and assisted by Dr. Neill G. Stevens, and Rev. Walter H. Goodman. Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Meta Hodges Winecoff, of Florence; one daughter, Mrs. A. J. Sampson, of Washington, D. C.; one son, Walter P. Winecoff, of Greenburg, Pa.; one brother, Warren Winecoff, of Kannapolis, N. C.; one granddaughter; and four great-grandsons. In his passing, a good husband and father, a kind friend and a faithful servant of God has gone to his reward.

The memorial was adopted to be put in the Minutes.

Rev. W. P. Conyers was granted permission to report on the Cherry Point-Havelock work. He gave figures as to the growth of the population and the rapid growth of the chapel there. (95 in Sunday school and 65 in church on April 19th). He presented Mr. Tom Lyle, elder-elect of the proposed Havelock church, to the Presbytery, and Mr. Lyle presented a petition for organization:

- I. Changes in the Book of Church Order were presented by Rev. N. P. Farrior.

**AN OVERTURE FROM THE PRESBYTERY OF WILMINGTON
TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN
CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES.**

Whereas there is a confusion of terminology in our Book of Church Order in the use of the word "Office" to denote both a classification in the ministry and a field of service, and whereas, even in Chapter XX which deals with "CHURCH ORDERS", the word "Order" is not used to indicate a classification in the ministry, the Presbytery of Wilmington respectfully overtures the General Assembly to amend the Book of Church Order as follows:

- A. To paragraph 30 add the words, "The ministry in the Presbyterian church consists of three Orders: the Teaching Eldership, the Ruling Eldership, and the Diaconate. Men are ordained to an Order in the ministry: and are elected to, or installed in, an Office. The Order is perpetual: the Office is for such length of time as may be

determined by the interested parties and the rules of the church. The Order is subjective, and denotes classification; the Office is objective, and denotes field of service.

B. In paragraph 31, line 3, delete the words, "and perpetual". And at the end of paragraph 31, add: "These offices are to be filled by men ordained to the orders corresponding respectively to them."

C. Wherever in other paragraphs of the Book of Church Order the word "Office" now denotes classification, substitute the word "Order", specifically in par. 102, lines 6 and 9; par. 113, line 6; par. 138, line 2; par. 153(6), line 19; par. 154, line 1; and par. 156, line 14.

- III. The overture by Rev. M. C. MacQueen concerning campaigns was presented with the recommendation that it be adopted. The Presbytery of Wilmington, concerned by the growing trend to replace the Biblical doctrine of stewardship with emotional appeals and pressure campaigns in our church respectfully overtures the General Assembly that it undertake on faith the substitution of a sound system of stewardship education, with emphasis on total commitment of life and possessions for the present practice of special offerings and promotional campaigns.

The overture was approved to be sent to the General Assembly.

- IV. The same overture as above was adopted to be sent to the Synod of North Carolina.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented its report which was adopted.

The Committee on Sessional Records begs leave to report that the sessional records have been examined and approved with the exceptions written in the session books.

and welcomed to the meeting. Ruling Elders attending Presbytery for the first time were introduced, and welcomed by the Moderator.

Rev. Jack W. Ware, pastor of the host church, welcomed the Presbytery.

The following Communications were received: Letter of Dismissal for Candidate Lardner Moore, from Potomac Presbytery, Letter of Dismissal for Rev. George W. Doherty, from Albemarle Presbytery, Letter of Dismissal for Rev. Norman H. Flowers, from East Mississippi Presbytery; these communications were referred to the committee on examinations; a letter from Rev. W. L. Foley, requesting dissolution of pastoral relations with the Westminster church and a Letter of Dismissal to Orange Presbytery. The Ruling Elder representing the Westminster church was heard, stating that the church reluctantly concurred in Mr. Foley's request. Words of affection and appreciation were spoken in behalf of Mr. Foley by members of the Presbytery. His requests were granted. The pastoral relationship was dissolved as of July 30, 1953. The Stated Clerk was instructed to write a letter of commendation to accompany the Letter of Dismissal. The report by J. Neveland Brand, Jr., C.P.A., on the audits of the books of the Central Treasurer of Benevolences, of Treasurer of Presbytery, and of the Treasurer of Presbytery's Office of Administration, was received as information and ordered filed with the Stated Clerk. The Presbytery authorized the Treasurer of Presbytery to pay for this audit, and future audits, out of the Contingent Fund.

A proposed docket, presented by the Stated Clerk, was adopted.

Rev. W. H. Allison, Chairman of the Committee on Annuities and Relief, made the annual report of the committee.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ANNUITIES AND RELIEF

Your Committee on Annuities and Relief submits the following report for the year April 1, 1952 to March 31, 1953:

1. For 13 years the Ministers' Annuity Fund has operated successfully. During this period \$1,857,753.52 has been paid in benefits. At the present time the following annuitants are receiving benefits: 248 ministers, 264 widows, and 55 orphans.
2. During the year 353 homes were aided from the funds of Ministerial Relief: 68 ministers, 257 widows, 15 homes of orphans, and 13 non-ministerial workers. This was a decrease of 19 homes from the number aided in the previous year. The amount remitted to the homes of these beneficiaries was \$212,067.25. In addition the sum of \$181,419.41 of the funds of Ministerial Relief was used to supplement the inadequate annuities of 310 annuitants, making a total of \$393,486.66 of Ministerial Relief funds that was remitted during the year. The total receipts for the Relief work from budgeted benevolence askings and the Joy Gift amounted to \$551,408.78.
3. The percentage of the budgeted benevolences for the work of this Board has been reduced from 8% to 7.5%. It is urgent that the full 7.5% of the askings for Assembly Causes be given by the churches this year. The Joy Gift is the strength of Minis-

terial Relief and enables our Board to supplement the inadequate annuities for so many of our retired ministers.

4. Wilmington Presbytery has only two beneficiaries of Ministerial Relief at present.
5. The Group Life Insurance plan approved by the General Assembly went into effect July 1, 1952. Approximately 1,450 full-time employees of the Church are participating in this program, and 7 claims have been paid during the first nine months of the insurance year.

The 1953 Assembly has approved the addition of hospitalization and surgical benefits to this program of Group Life Insurance.

Rev. William Crowe, Jr., Chairman of the Committee on Educational Institutions, presented a resolution in behalf of Peace College as follows:

WHEREAS, Peace College of Raleigh, North Carolina, and Peace Institute, Inc., the corporation owning and holding the property of said college, are controlled and operated by trustees elected by the First Presbyterian Church of Raleigh, North Carolina, and the Presbyteries of Albemarle, Granville, Kings Mountain, Orange, and Wilmington, of the Synod of North Carolina, of The Presbyterian Church in the United States; and,

WHEREAS, the Synod of North Carolina has urged the Presbyteries now having control of the said college to turn over and transfer to the Synod of North Carolina the control of and the responsibility for the operation of the said college and corporation, so that it would be the responsibility of all the Presbyteries of the said Synod to contribute to the expense of said operation and to participate in the control of said college and corporation; and,

WHEREAS, other Presbyteries of the Synod have in the past been contributing to the expense of the operation of said college; and,

WHEREAS, it appears to the Presbytery of Wilmington that it is advisable and to the best interest of said college that the control of Peace College and said corporation be transferred to the said Synod of North Carolina:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Presbytery of Wilmington that the ownership and control of and the responsibility for the operation of said Peace College and Peace Institute, Inc., be turned over and transferred to the Synod of North Carolina, of The Presbyterian Church in the United States; and, that upon the adoption of a resolution similar to this by the First Presbyterian Church of Raleigh and each of the other Presbyteries now having control of said college and corporation, the present trustees of said college and corporation be, and are authorized to do all things necessary to transfer ownership and control of said college and corporation to said Synod of North Carolina.

Pending action upon this resolution, Presbytery heard Dr. Price H. Gwynn on the approaching financial campaign for Flora Macdonald College. This was received as information.

The resolution in behalf of Peace College was adopted.

Rev. W. H. Goodman, Chairman of the Committee on Special Causes, made the annual report of the committee, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SPECIAL CAUSES

I. THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

During the year 1952 the American Bible Society placed 13,369,-030 Bibles, Testaments, and portions of Scripture in the hands of the people throughout the world. Scriptures for the blind were distributed in 36 languages. The General Assembly accepted \$30,-000 for this cause in its Budget for the year 1954.

II. HISTORICAL FOUNDATION

In October, 1952, work was begun in Montreat on the new Historical Foundation Building. Ministers, Ruling Elders and Deacons have been asked to consider prayerfully and carefully the discharge of their obligation to make possible the completion of this building. Cost of construction will be something over \$110,000.

III. MONTREAT

Sunday, May 30, 1954 has been designated as Montreat Day. Pastors, and Sessions are urged to give favorable notice to this Day for Montreat and its needs, to pray for the Spirit's fullest blessing upon Montreat, and wherever possible to receive an offering. The problem of Montreat College was committed for another year to an ad interim committee to report to the 1954 Assembly. Lest the College be left to the mercy of an overbearing operating deficit while the Assembly decides its fate, the Assembly has added \$32,000 to its budget for Montreat for 1954, and designated that amount for education.

IV. STILLMAN COLLEGE

The two million dollar campaign for Negro Work, one million of which goes to Stillman College, is well over the top. The presentation of the \$75,000 of the Women of the Church has endowed a Chair of Bible, which will be filled in September, 1953. Over 300 students enrolled during the past year. Of the amount allocated to Stillman in the general fund of the Assembly, the College failed to receive \$32,709.39. It is not surprising to know that Stillman operated during the past year with a net deficit of approximately \$27,000.

The School has been put on the list of The Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges for study leading to accreditation.

V. LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE

For the support of this cause, the Assembly has accepted for the year 1954 the amount of \$758.46.

VI. ASSEMBLY'S TRAINING SCHOOL

Training School Day has been set for April 25, 1954. Churches are urged to take this opportunity to become acquainted with the service this School is rendering, the opportunities it offers young Christians, and its needs. During the past year 116 students were enrolled. The new academic building under construction should be completed by September.

The ad-interim committee studying the compensation of Pastors made a supplemental report as follows:

SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT OF PRESBYTERY'S AD-INTERIM COMMITTEE TO STUDY COMPENSATION OF PASTORS

This Committee, appointed at the January 1953 meeting of Wilmington Presbytery and re-appointed at the April 1953 meeting, herewith presents its further report on the subject of compensation to its pastors:

April Presbytery approved recommendations made by this Committee in its report of April 21, 1953, (1) that minimum annual compensation be objectively set at \$3,300 with living quarters for unmarried ministers, and \$3,600 with manse for married ministers with up to two children; (2) that churches, singly or in groups, give consideration to the setting of pastors' compensation higher than such minima; (3) that churches now assisted by Presbytery's Home Mission Committee in the payment of pastors' compensation be urged to, as soon as and to the extent possible, relieve Presbytery of that burden so that funds may be available for further extension of Home Mission Work in the Presbytery; and (4) that further study and handling be given the subject to include contacts with officers of such churches that it may be felt should give consideration to the payment of more adequate compensation to its pastors.

Following its re-appointment, this Committee, after further consultation with the Executive Secretary of Presbytery and considering ways and means of carrying out Presbytery's latest instructions handled the subject in the case of five (5) groups of churches where, in the light of latest data available, there seemed reason to think that the pastors were not being compensated in total amounts to the extent of the minima objectively adopted by Presbytery. Contacts with officers of the churches concerned by lay members of this Committee have resulted in the following findings and results:

One two-church group had already increased its total compensation, all direct, to a total in excess of the applicable minimum;

In one two-church group one congregation has agreed to increase its proportion and the other has indicated it will do likewise, which, with a continuing participation by Presbytery, would bring the total compensation up to the applicable minimum;

In another two-church group, the total compensation has been increased to the applicable minimum, without Presbytery assistance;

In still another two-church group, both congregations have agreed to increases which will bring the total compensation to applicable minimum, without Presbytery assistance;

In one four-church group the congregations, by individual actions, have arranged to increase the total compensation to the applicable minimum and at the same time relieve Presbytery of substantial participation.

Your chairman acknowledges with appreciation the wise counsel and assistance of Presbytery's Executive Secretary and the ministerial members of this Committee, and heartily commends the work of its lay members, particularly that of Ruling Elders Edwards, Cates and Marks by reason of the successful culmination of their efforts with Elders and Deacons of the four (4) groups of churches contacted.

Having carried out Presbytery's instructions, the Committee requests its discharge.

The Rev. William Crowe, Jr. made the report for Presbytery's Council.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT TO THE PRESBYTERY OF WILMINGTON BY THE COUNCIL OF PRESBYTERY JACKSONVILLE, N. C., OCTOBER 20, 1953

Since the last report of the Council to the Presbytery a vast variety of spiritual influences have been set to work through the bounds of Presbytery, through the congregations and through the leadership of committees and the office of the executive. We have no means of describing the details of this great enterprise. We are recording a number of significant facts for the information of the Presbytery. It should be stated at the outset that the results of leadership both within the congregations and within the Presbytery at large have not been perfect nor has the work of any of our human leadership been perfect. Therefore, much is left to be desired in the way of achieving the purposes of Christ's Kingdom.

We are pleased to report that young peoples work seems to have prospered during the past year. There has been a slight increase in the number of organizations. There seems to be more attention being given in the congregations to securing and training effective adult advisors for youth groups. The Presbytery organizations of young people are gradually leading the local organizations into practicing orderly adherence to the youth manuals. During the summer the youth conferences were quite well attended in spite of the fact that the Pioneer conferences had to be reduced from the normal two to only one this year because of conflicting dates at the conference site. The senior conference at Red Springs was equally well attended and was characterized by a very fine spirit.

Evangelism continues to play an important role in the congregations. This factor has been the cause of more persons than ever before being received on profession of faith and on certificate of

transfer. In the Wilmington area the Laymen's Christian Mission was sponsored for the fourth consecutive time last spring by the congregations and under the general leadership of Dr. W. C. Mebane. For the first time there was no union evangelistic preaching but each congregation had its own separate services. However, there was a union visitation movement in connection with the mission under the leadership for the second year of Dr. W. H. McCorkle, Director of Evangelism for the General Assembly. There is reason to believe that the pastors of the Presbytery are becoming more and more conscious of the need of communicant's classes for children and young people and this means better prepared youth appearing before Sessions.

Three new churches have been organized since the Council's last report including Oak Grove and the Little Chapel on the Board Walk, both outposts of the First Church, Wilmington, N. C., and Kings Chapel, near Jacksonville. A committee was appointed by order of the Council at its last meeting in September for the study of the grouping of Churches in the Presbytery. The committee was requested to make a partial report to this meeting of the Presbytery regarding a specific area.

The Sunday School enrollment has reached a new peak. However, this enrollment fluctuates too much from year to year for any certainty to be expressed regarding the figures. It is a matter of interest that several cooperative ventures are being engaged in with other denominations in circumstances where no single denomination is welcomed.

Very successful Leadership Training Schools were held in three areas of the Presbytery during the year: in Wallace for the churches of the Northern end of the Presbytery, in Wilmington for the churches of the Central area of the Presbytery and in Whiteville for the churches in the Southern end of the Presbytery.

Another retreat for ministers was held in the cottage owned by Mr. Holmes Davis on Wrightsville Beach in September. Mr. Davis provided this handsome lodging for the ministers as a generous courtesy. Dr. William Oglesby of Union Seminary spent the time of the retreat leading discussions in Pastoral Counseling.

The financial stewardship of the Presbytery seems to be doing some better. One encouraging fact is that the Presbytery has established a minimum salary for unmarried ministers of \$3,300.00; and \$3,600.00 for a married minister besides a manse. This minimum has been achieved through the successful work of a committee appointed by the Presbytery, largely of laymen, to study the matter of salaries of ministers. Mr. George L. Mitchell of Wilmington was chairman of this committee. By a special delegation the lay members of the committee interviewed leaders of certain congregations for the purpose of getting them to give more adequate support to their ministers. The results were excellent and uniform. The increases were made by the congregations and did not become an added responsibility on the Home Mission fund of the Presbytery.

The requested budget for 1954 is as follows: Assembly \$77,777.00, Synod \$47,309.00, Presbytery \$43,606.16, with an equalization fund of \$11,740.12. These totals add to \$168,584.58. Presbytery's Council decided to distribute this budget among the congregations at the straight per capita rate which is 14.334. Attached to this sheet there are other sheets indicating the analysis of the requested budget for

all of these causes. It is a matter of interest that the financial reports for the year closing March 31, 1953 indicated that more money was given through the various treasuries both to benevolences and current expenses than ever before.

There are two problems in the Presbytery that ought to be given serious attention. One of them has to do with the principles of our financial stewardship. Our Presbytery remains at the bottom of the list of Presbyteries in the Synod. Our giving is lower than the average of the General Assembly. We have a partial explanation of this fact in that we have had no major building operations among the congregations of this Presbytery and most other Presbyteries have had such operations. Besides, the average income of this area is the lowest in the Synod. These are only partial explanations but they ought to be considered. The chairman of this Council met with various laymen to explain the goals of the Presbytery and help them to understand our weaknesses. A number of these laymen went to a good many congregations or groups of leaders in congregations and presented the appeal for increases. Undoubtedly we ought to do better than we are doing as a Presbytery and that means our congregations should do better. Some of us have given a great deal of thought to this matter. There seems to be a general belief that our congregations lack proper initiative among leading laymen. Certainly it would be well for such laymen to search themselves and discover whether or not it is they or their pastors who are not providing the proper leadership for our people.

The other problem arises directly out of our success in the work of Evangelism. It is one that attends success but is definitely a problem, namely, that increasing numbers of people coming into our Churches require a great deal of thought so that they may be reasonably indoctrinated with Christian teachings on the one hand and reasonably assimilated into our congregational life on the other. Neither of these essential conditions will be met unless definite effort is made toward these ends.

The report of the committee on Homes was made by the Rev. M. J. McChesney and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HOMES

Barium Springs Orphan's Home

Through the providence of God and the loyalty of His people another good year has been completed in the life of the Home at Barium Springs. The Regents report that this was the best year financially that the institution has known. Even so rising costs have been such that the Home broke just about even in its operating budget. The salaries of those in the service of the Home have been raised, but are still low.

In the matter of Little Joe's Church, the Regents report that Concord Presbytery, acting upon the request of Synod's Commission, has given the Church special status wherein the Home has equal voice in the calling of a minister and providing for his salary, and in the planning and execution of the Religious Education Program as it affects the children of the Home. Final plans for the new Church building have been approved and contracts will be let for the erection of the Sanctuary in the fall.

Several needs of the Home should be mentioned regarding its physical equipment: (1) The sewage disposal system is utterly inadequate and totally outmoded and the State Department of Health is counseling the administration in what is necessary and requiring that it be installed. (2) The swimming pool, built twenty-five years ago, has just about seen its years of service and will before long have to be replaced or taken out of use. For three years the Health Department has failed to approve the pool, but has not yet condemned it entirely.

For the year that lies ahead the continuing loyalty and interest of the Churches of Wilmington Presbytery will be needed, so that the Home may retain its high standards of Christian service to its boys and girls. Your special gifts and Thanksgiving Day offerings to the Home will be needed and wisely used. And the prayers of Presbyterians for the work of the Home are essential.

The Presbyterian Home

High Point, N. C.

The Board of Trustees reports the following major activities of the Home during the past year:

"On November 5, 1952 we received our twenty-fourth Member, which filled the Home to its capacity." The age range of the Members is from seventy to ninety-two, and thus far there has been only one death in the membership. It is the policy of the Admissions Committee, insofar as possible, to have Members from each supporting Presbytery. Mrs. Lulu B. Dunn of Wallace and Miss Kathryn McAlister of Rose Hill are Members in the Home from Wilmington Presbytery.

"On April 2, 1953, bids were received and contracts were awarded totaling \$290,991.00"—for construction of the much needed second unit of the Home. "We have on hand as of July 31, 1953 in the Building Fund \$181,080.21 to apply against this contractual obligation . . . We will need \$83,654.27 to finish paying for the new addi-

tion. We hope to obtain this from individual gifts, memorials, bequests, etc." The Churches of Wilmington Presbytery are asked to remember the Home with a special offering on Mother's Day, May 9, 1954.

The addition will provide space for thirty-six Members, making the total capacity of the Home sixty. When it is completed, the Home will have a total of 46 single rooms and seven double rooms.

Mr. R. A. Short, Superintendent of the Home, says, "We have some beautiful slides of the Home, and I am happy to appear before any group who is interested in having me do so to show the slides and share with them our experiences in operating the Home."

Visitors to the Home are always welcome. Members of Wilmington Presbytery who have opportunity to do so are urged to see for themselves what God hath wrought through their contributions to the Presbyterian Home at High Point, North Carolina.

The William Black Home

The 1953 Entertainment Season of the William Black Home extended from June 1st to August 31st. Thirty-three Commissioners of the General Assembly were guests of the Home and were lavish in expressions of appreciation of the entertainment enjoyed. The Home has now reached the position of rendering more aid to our faithful Home Mission workers. Eight of our Presbyterian workers were provided free entertainment for a week each in the month of August. This was just the beginning of what the William Black Home desires to do for our home missionaries, while at the same time furnishing room and board for other visitors to Montreat from one to four dollars less than like service can be had elsewhere.

The Board of the Home reports that, since last year, the dining room and kitchen have been enlarged, a storage pantry constructed, servant quarters of four rooms erected in the rear of the Home, and parking lot paved at a total cost of approximately \$9,000.00. Operational expenses of the season were met in full, with a small balance assured.

Several years ago the Presbytery of Wilmington accepted a request of the William Black Home for \$4,000.00 for construction purposes, with proportional quotas assigned to the various Churches. Of this \$4,000.00, less than \$100.00 has been paid to date, and it is evident that the recommendation was accepted by Presbytery without full understanding and due consideration of the Churches' ability and intention to pay. The Churches, by and large, simply have not accepted their quotas.

The committee on Resolutions made the following recommendations:

3. We express our appreciation to our retiring Moderator Dr. Frank Haasis for his inspiring message to us and for the fine job he did as Moderator.

4. We express our appreciation to Chaplain M. W. Graham for his work in behalf of this meeting of Presbytery.

Presbytery rescinded the action giving the Commission on the Minister and His Work authority to dissolve pastorates and to grant letters of dismissal to ministers who have accepted calls to other churches.

The Presbytery authorized its trustees to transfer the property now held by them for the use of the Webb Memorial Presbyterian church of Morehead City to the Trustees of the Webb Memorial Presbyterian Church of Morehead City when the congregation requests the transfer.

The Rev. W. B. Hood was nominated as moderator of the January meeting of Presbytery.

The minutes were read and approved and Presbytery adjourned to meet at the St. Andrews-Covenant Presbyterian church of Wilmington, Tuesday, October 28th at 2:00 P.M.

MINUTES OF WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

The Presbytery of Wilmington met in an adjourned session in the St. Andrews-Covenant church, Wilmington, N. C., on Tuesday, October 27, 1953, for the purpose of studying the proposed plan for the union of the Presbyterian church U.S.A., The United Presbyterian church, and the Presbyterian church, U.S., and making recommendations to the committee on cooperation and union.

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Rev. Leslie C. Tucker, and was constituted with prayer led by Rev. J. W. Miller.

Rev. W. Priestley Conyers III, chairman of the committee appointed to promote the study of the proposed plan of union, made the report for his committee and led the discussion of the proposed plan.

The Presbytery adopted six recommendations and authorized the Stated Clerk to transmit these to the Rev. E. C. Scott, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly to be transmitted by him to the Committee on Cooperation and Union.

The Recommendations:

1. That questions 1 and 2 in the Directory of Worship of the Presbyterian church U.S. (Paragraph 356,) be substituted for questions 1 and 2, Chapter 8, page 95, The Plan providing for the Union.

2. That the Plan providing for Union, provide that "the deacons shall handle the business affairs of the local church under the control of the Session, and that Trustees hold property." (This recommendation would provide for the functions of Deacons and Trustees to be the same in the united church as they are present in the Presbyterian church U.S.)

3. In chapter 11, paragraph 9, line 6, page 122 of the Proposed Plan for Union, insert the word "ordinarily," thus causing the sentence to read: "It shall ordinarily be the practice of the Session to open and close its meetings with prayer."

4. In Chapter 12, paragraph 14, page 126, line 3, substitute "shall" for may, causing the statement to read: "he shall perform all the offices of a pastor . . ."

5. In chapter 17, paragraph 5, line 3, page 137, Plan Providing for Union substitute the word "Session" for the words "the moderator of the Session."

6. That the Committee on Cooperation and Union give serious consideration to the provision of Regional Synods and if practicable incorporate the provision in the Proposed Plan for Union.

The Minutes of the meeting were read and approved, and Presbytery adjourned with prayer by Rev. William Hood.

Mrs. John Farrison, President of the Women of the Presbytery was introduced to the Presbytery, and welcomed to this meeting.

Elders representing their sessions for the first time were introduced to the Presbytery and welcomed by the Moderator.

The Stated Clerk presented a docket to Presbytery which was amended and adopted.

The following communications were read and actions taken as noted:

A letter of dismissal for the Rev. Charles Worth from the Presbytery of Fayetteville, to the committee on Examinations.

A letter of thanks from Dr. E. E. Gillespie for the check sent by Presbytery to the William Black Home, received as information.

A request from the Rev. D. A. Bowles for a letter of dismissal to New Hanover Presbytery was granted.

The resignation of Mr. Joshua S. James as a Trustee of Presbytery was accepted, and the Stated Clerk was requested to write a letter of thanks to Mr. James for his services to the Presbytery.

A request from the Session of the Willard Church for a transfer of the title to the church property from the Trustees of Presbytery to the Trustees of the church was granted, and the Trustees of Presbytery were authorized to make the transfer.

A proposed lease on property owned by Presbytery in Havelock, from the Cherry Point Motor Company, was referred to the Home Missions committee.

The committee on Educational Institutions made its report. Pending adoption of the report, Presbytery heard Dr. Marshall S. Woodson, President of Flora Macdonald College, relative to the financial campaign now in progress. The report was adopted and is as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

During the past church year of 9 months the campaign for funds for Flora Macdonald College has been conducted. We are to be given a description of the results of that campaign by the president of the college, Dr. Marshall Woodson, at this meeting of the Presbytery. The campaign has met an unusual response on the part of the public. For the first time this college has made an important place for itself in the thinking of the people in the immediate area of the city of Wilmington.

We wish to report that the college campaign has not only raised funds for the college but that it has made the importance of this in-

stitution known to large numbers of people and many of them have been convinced sufficiently to make them ready patrons of the college in the years to come.

It is our understanding that Peace College is preparing to conduct a canvass for funds during the current year and it is to be hoped that this campaign will have the same quality of support from Presbyterian leaders that has been enjoyed by Flora Macdonald College and some time ago by Union Seminary. Undoubtedly people are becoming aware of the great value of these institutions.

We regret to record the fact of the death of Miss Lucy Steele, professor of Bible at Peace College. Miss Steele was killed in an automobile accident, Monday night, January 11. Miss Steele was probably the leading woman in the state of North Carolina. Her influence was very wide spread. Her death is one of the worst sorrows that could come to the college that she served. It seems fitting that this report should include an expression of sympathy to the institution.

While there are other matters of interest in connection with educational institutions, it seems unwise to make written reports of this kind too detailed and only to report those outstanding circumstances which demand being made a matter of record.

Rev. Priestley Conyers III, Chairman of the Committee on Woman's Work, presented Mrs. John Farring, President of the Women of Wilmington Presbytery, who made her annual report on Women's Work in the Presbytery. The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH

Mrs. John Farring, President

This report is made with thanksgiving to God for His strength and power; and the faith, hope, and love manifested in the lives of the more than 4500 Women of the Church of Wilmington Presbytery. We are happy to report the reorganization of Bethel and a new organization at Pineland which brings our total organized groups to 72. Through the efforts of the Chairman of Spiritual Growth, Elkton, Maple Hill, Mt. Williams, Hebron, and Antioch have contact women who receive materials for Bible study from the Board of Women's Work. Only Bladenboro and Page's Mill are without any contact with the Women's work.

At the annual meeting April, 1953 the Women of the Church adopted a recommendation that the regular percentage for World

Missions of the benevolent budget be sent undesignated to the Board of World Missions. Previously the Kiangyin Christian Hospital had been their sole and definite objective on the foreign field. During World War II when no funds could go into China, the contributions accumulated and were placed on deposit with the Board of World Missions at 3% interest. When the Communists took China, the work was closed indefinitely. At the beginning of the church year there was a balance of \$11,231.12 of which \$9,000.00 has been allocated for a Dispensary at the Bulape Station in the Belgian Congo. Mr. Hearn, treasurer, reports a balance including \$260.28 interest for the nine months year of \$2,828.68.

An offering of \$1,800.20 was received for the Birthday Objective which was Furlough Homes for missionaries. This amount was an increase of \$205.21 over last year.

There was a record attendance of 21 at the Eighth Annual Training School at Peace College. Also 21 attended the Montreat Women's Training School. Many local groups sent Negro women to the Negro Women's Conference in Winston-Salem. The results are most gratifying as these capable and consecrated women informed and inspired return to help their own race in their local communities. Many young people were helped financially and encouraged to attend their Conferences.

White Cross quota for supplies for three hospitals in Africa was met and \$227.15 contributed. After transportation charges the balance in cash was turned over to the Board of World Missions for hospital equipment and supplies.

In the fall seven District Conferences were held with a total attendance of 627, and an offering of \$367.73 to increase the \$1,500 principal of the Flora Macdonald Scholarship Fund. Rev. M. C. MacQueen brought inspirational messages to six of the Conferences and the Rev. F. T. Read to the Conference for Evening Circles. The offering for District 1 of which Mrs. John E. Evans is chairman was designated as a memorial to Mrs. Mildred Evans Robinson. Through special contributions by the Women of the Church of Clinton, Burgaw, Rockfish, Pink Hill, Potts Memorial, and Hallsville the total offering was increased to \$500 giving a principal of \$2,000 invested at 5%. This will provide an annual scholarship of \$100 for a student from Wilmington Presbytery.

Reports show spiritual growth by increased interest and participation in prayer, Bible study, visitation evangelism, tithing and leadership training.

The services rendered through local community work, overseas relief, and interchurch aid are too numerous and vast to list.

It has been a fruitful year and thrilling progress has been made by our women. Yet there abides a deep concern for limitations which indifference sets upon our Kingdom service. We are not fully accepting our personal responsibility for witnessing and hundreds remain unenlisted for Christ in our Presbytery. Many of our churches do not accept their proportionate share of the work or the budget asked by Presbytery and Synod; thereby failing to fulfill the commission, "Ye shall be my witnesses, both in Jerusalem . . . and unto the uttermost part of the earth." The praying hands of our women reach up to God for renewed strength and out to you for support and cooperation in our common task.

The report of the Treasurer of the funds of Presbytery made his report. The papers were admitted to record, and the treasurer's books ordered turned over to the committee on audits for study.

The Executive Committee of Christian Education made its annual report which was adopted as follows:

**1ST ANNUAL REPORT, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF
CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

TO

THE PRESBYTERY OF WILMINGTON, APRIL 20, 1954

Your Executive Committee of Christian Education is encouraged because of the evidences of God's guidance and blessing upon the total educational program of our Presbytery over the past year. In every area of responsibility the committee feels the past year has been one of real development in our work.

We point to the increased enrollment figures for our Sunday Schools, the largest number of Daily Vacation Church schools ever held in our Presbytery, the successful Senior High Fellowship conference held at Red Springs, and the various activities of the Youth Council in leading our Senior High school group in growth in knowledge and in service; the pioneer camps and the largest Men of the Church meeting ever held in our Presbytery. All of these statistical evidences point to increased interest in the things which pertain to churchmanship, and they also point to a new dedication of time and talents. For all of these your committee is grateful.

We are encouraged also by the leadership now being given to the various areas of our responsibility by those immediately responsible for them. Rev. J. C. McCann is giving vigorous leadership to the children's work in the Presbytery. Demonstration centers where leaders may go to observe teaching methods and usages are being planned, as is also a newsletter to be sent to the children's work counselors in each local church.

The young peoples division is under the leadership of Rev. M. G. Stimson, and Rev. J. W. Ware. Pioneer Camps are scheduled for June of this summer and the Senior Conference also is scheduled for June. In April the Spring rally of the Senior High fellowship was held with over 350 in attendance and a Pioneer conclave was held with 150 registered pioneers and 30 registered leaders of pioneers. We confidently expect that the inspiration and guidance given in these two meetings will be of valuable assistance in strengthening the work of the Youth in our churches.

The Adult Work of the Presbytery lags somewhat behind the work for children and young people. However, we have for the first time a Young Adult rally planned for this group in the Presbytery to be held at Pearsall Church, April 25th from 3:00—8:30 P.M. and the Men's Council of the Presbytery is beginning to function with vigor. Rev. J. T. Hayter is the contact person from our committee for Young Adult work, and Rev. N. H. Flowers for Men's Work. We are hopeful that the future will find these areas of work and interest constantly growing in strength to the end that the program of the Church may be undergirded by responsible adult leadership.

Leadership education has also been an important part of the work of your committee. Area schools have been held in the Presbytery and it is hoped that these, and local schools as well, may be continued during the year ahead. The attendance at the area school in Wilmington was over 200 from 21 churches, in Wallace, 238 from 17 churches. This is an area in which every church ought to develop a continuing program to the end that leadership may be multiplied and encouraged and better prepared for its tasks and opportunities.

We now have 8 candidates for the ministry under the care of Presbytery attending approved institutions of higher learning.

In spite of these things your committee is not complacent. We are aware that the work of Christian Education in Wilmington Presbytery is not completed. We point out to you some of the disturbing factors in our Educational Work.

First of all we would point out that the enrollment on our Church schools far exceeds our average attendance. Last year our churches reported an enrollment of over 10,000 persons in Church schools, but an average attendance of less than 4,500. Somewhere we are losing far too many of those whom we enroll, and even those who come, attend so irregularly, that the work is hampered, and knowledge is at best very imperfect. Your Committee would challenge the Sessions of each church to make a thorough study of the rolls of your church school, with a view to enlisting those who are now at best but marginal members of the school. Perhaps it would be well for our enrollment to drop to a more honest figure, that we might work more diligently to reach the unreached for Christ. Enrollment is not enlistment.

Another matter which is of concern to our committee is the large number of churches which have no organized work for the Children or Young People, and the even larger number of churches that are apparently making no effort to enlist adults in active Christian learning and work. We reported last year from our 80 churches 72 organized groups of women, but only 17 organized groups of men. We reported only 27 Senior High fellowships and only 20 Pioneer fellowships. Six churches reported a second session for Juniors, and 7 reported Young Adult groups. Now we recognize that not every church ought to have every one of these groups, but we feel that the disparity between the number of women's organizations and that for other groups is all together too large. Again we challenge the Sessions of the Churches to make a thorough study of the total program of organization in your church with a view to making the total program effective for all enrolled, to the end that each person may be enlisted for Christ.

Your committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That each church recognize Christian College Day, April 25th, with appropriate announcements and prayers for our Christian Colleges.

2. That Presbytery approve the election of Rev. J. T. Hayter as director of the Pioneer Camps and of Rev. J. W. Ware as director of the Senior High Conference. The dates of these are as follows:

Camps: June 21-26 and June 28—July 3.

Conference: June 14-19 at Flora Macdonald College.

3. That every church in the Presbytery sponsor a Daily Vacation Church school for a period of at least ten sessions, and that leaders be enlisted for these schools at once in order that they may attend an institution for Vacation Church school leaders to be held in Wallace, May 11th, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

4. That the churches of the Presbytery make full use of the services offered to us through Synod's area worker, Miss Jane Chamblee. A list of those services is attached to this report.

5. That each church begin now to promote the Men's convention to be held in New Orleans October 15-17th, and that we seek to have our full quota of 92 men in attendance at that convention.

6. That Presbytery approve the transfer of a sum of \$700.00 from the Pioneer Camp fund of the Presbytery to the Treasurer of the Committee. This sum or a part of it as approved by the Executive Committee to be used by the sub-committees of the Christian Education committee for their work for the remainder of this church year, and that Presbytery instruct the Council of Presbytery to study the feasibility of placing this committee in the budget for the years which are ahead.

7. That Presbytery hear Mr. Leslie Boney, Jr., President of the Men of the Presbytery relative to the Men's Convention in New Orleans.

8. That Men's clubs and classes seek out worthy negro youth and defray their expenses to the Conference for Negro Youth to be held at Fayetteville, in June.

9. That Presbytery hear an address by Dr. Marshall C. Dendy, Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education.

The Committee on Annuities and Relief made its report which was adopted as follows:

1. For fourteen years the Ministers' Annuity Fund has operated successfully. It has met in full every commitment, and the actuaries and auditors report the fund to be in a good actuarial and financial condition. Benefits paid since the Fund began are:

2. The Employees' Annuity Fund, which began to operate on September 1, 1942, had 229 members enrolled on December 31, 1953. Since this Fund began 6 have retired because of age and 3 have retired because of total and permanent disability. One age annuitant returned to active service.

3. During the year 333 homes were aided from the funds of Ministerial Relief: 59 ministers, 245 widows, 16 homes of orphans, 13 non-ministerial workers. This was a decrease of 20 homes from the number aided in the previous year. The amount remitted to the homes of these beneficiaries was \$162,525.84. In addition the sum of \$134,740.30 of the funds of Ministerial Relief was used to supplement the inadequate annuities of 299 annuitants. A total of \$297,266.14 of Ministerial Relief Funds were remitted during the year to beneficiaries and annuitants with inadequate annuities. The amount granted was at a rate in excess of that of any previous year, but the Board is convinced that it is still not enough to relieve the retired ministers and their dependents of the burdens of the high cost of living.

4. During the year the Board stressed the request of the General Assembly that the church contribute to its work the full percentage of the budgeted benevolence askings, and presented vigorously an appeal for a large Joy Gift Offering in December. Since the major source of income with which the Board carries on its relief work is the Joy Gift, it is urgent that this annual offering be a generous one, if the Board is to have the funds with which to provide the necessities of life for the retired ministers. It is a pleasure to report that total receipts for the Relief Work during the year 1953 amounted to \$480,002.17.

5. The General Assembly has asked that 7.60% of the total amount requested for its benevolent work for 1954 be given by the churches to the board of Annuities and Relief. With this modest amount the Board must minister in the name of the Church to all the necessities of over 632 homes of retired ministers. We earnestly urge that all Synods, Presbyteries, and Churches meet in full their requested percentage asking in order that those who served long and well may be freed of needless anxieties in the days of their old age.

6. Acting upon instructions given to it by the General Assembly, the Board has presented to the Church a Group Insurance Plan for the protection of its full-time salaried personnel. While an excellent response has been made to this opportunity for the Church to show appreciation of those who serve her, many others equally deserving have not been included yet. We hope they may be brought in as of July 1, 1954, when the non-medical entrance provision is available again.

7. Please take note of the fact that beginning February 1, 1954, the Board of Annuities and Relief will be located at 341-C Ponce de Leon Avenue, N. E., Atlanta 5, Georgia.

8. Wilmington Presbytery has two beneficiaries of Ministerial Relief at the present time. Wilmington Presbytery contributed \$4,877.73 to Ministerial Relief during the past church year.

RECOMMENDATION

Since it is difficult for the home mission pastor to inform the Board of Annuities and Relief of the sources and amounts paid on his salary without having this information, we move that the executive secretary be asked to inform these pastors on this matter at the beginning of each year, giving the amounts paid by the Presbytery, and Synod, including the manse allowance, in order that the pastor might inform the Board with as few questions arising as possible.

Elders attending Presbytery for the first time were introduced to the Presbytery by the respective pastors of the churches represented.

MINUTES OF WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

The docket was presented by the Stated Clerk and was adopted as amended.

The following communications were presented to Presbytery:

Requests to be excused from this meeting of Presbytery from the Rev. W. H. Allison and the Rev. Leslie C. Tucker, referred to the standing committee on leave of absence.

A resolution adopted by the Synod of N. C. regarding the actions taken by certain Sessions with reference to the matter of segregation was read and adopted by the Presbytery and ordered sent to each Session of the Presbytery. The resolution is as follows:

WHEREAS we are aware that certain Sessions have taken action relative to the deliverance of the 1954 General Assembly on the matter of the church and segregation, and that these actions have been disseminated,

AND, WHEREAS, the official action of the General Assembly in such matters has not been available for the study urged by the Assembly among the courts of the church,

AND WHEREAS such deliverances without the study of the official action of the Assembly are unworthy of the dimension of the subject and could unjustly prejudice the minds of some with regard to the action of the Assembly,

AND, WHEREAS, such premature deliverance may imply an impeachment of the honor of Christ and discredit the doctrinal and ecclesiastical heritage of our beloved Church,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, without invalidating the right of any church court to deliver itself decently and in order on subjects of mutual concern, the Synod of North Carolina would urge all Presbyteries and Sessions within its bounds to desist from any deliverances on the subject of the church and segregation until they shall have had ample time to study carefully and prayerfully the action of the General Assembly in the matter.

A communication from Dr. E. C. Scott, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, regarding the procedure in action on the Plan of Union was received as information and the recommendations adopted as follows:

ACTION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The General Assembly adopted the following recommendations concerning the Plan of Union:

1. That the 1954 General Assembly receive and approve the Plan and recommend it to the Presbyteries for their advice and consent, in accordance with the Form of Government of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, Par. 168.

2. That the 1954 General Assembly give an affirmative answer to the following Categorical Question (Plan of Union, page 14):

Shall the Presbyterian Church in the United States, and The United Presbyterian Church of North America, be united to form The Presbyterian Church of the United States

(a) On the doctrinal basis of the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as the supreme standard, acknowledged as the in-

spired Word of God, the only infallible rule of faith and practice; and upon the subordinate standards now held by the three negotiating churches, viz., the Westminster Confession of Faith and Larger and Shorter Catechisms, together with amendments thereto herewith submitted, all of which amendments have been hitherto adopted by one or more of the negotiating churches;

- (b) On the governmental basis of the Book of Church Order which consists of the Directory for Worship, the Form of Government, and the Book of Discipline, herewith submitted;
 - (c) On the basis of the Constitution of the united church which consists of the subordinate standards named in (a) and the Book of Church Order named in (b) above;
 - (d) On the basis of the Concurrent Declarations numbered 1-15 inclusive and the Supplemental Covenant and Agreement?
3. That the 1954 General Assembly *recommend* to each Presbytery:
- (1) That upon receipt of the Plan of Union from the General Assembly for its "advicc and consent," each Presbytery refer the Plan to a standing or special committee for study and report.
 - (2) That the committee, after carefully considering the Plan of Union and noting its revisions, and after earnestly and prayerfully seeking to discover God's will for the church, report to a stated meeting of Presbytery prior to the taking of a vote, not before January 1, 1955.
4. That each Presbytery be instructed that its vote is to be "yes" or "no" on the Categorical Question precisely as it is worded on page 14 of the Plan of Union, as Revised, Nov., 1953.
5. That inasmuch as there is agreement by all of our churches on the value of Christian cooperation, the 1954 General Assembly
- (1) Encourages the boards and agencies working in the same field to continue their cooperation; and
 - (2) Requests the preparation of tentative interim plans for carrying on work before the Plan of Union goes into effect, these interim plans to be presented to the 1955 General Assemblies, if and when the Presbyteries shall have approved the Plan of Union; and
 - (3) Encourages Presbyteries to invite representatives of the other churches to be present with them, and share fully in their discussion concerning union. (Minutes, 1954, pp. 65-66.)

Presbytery authorized that the Special Committee, which is to be appointed in accordance with the provisions of the recommendations adopted in the communication from the General Assembly, make every effort to see that the greatest possible amount of information regarding the Plan of Union be made available to every congregation in the bounds of Wilmington Presbytery.

Presbytery urges all churches and Sessions to make full use of Presbytery's Committee in securing information relative to the issues involved in the Plan of Union.

The Executive Committee of Church Extension made its annual report, through the chairman, Dr. E. D. Witherspoon. The report and recommendations were adopted as follows:

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF CHURCH EXTENSION REPORT TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY JULY 20, 1954

In presenting the report of the Executive Committee of Church Extension, we report on our work as it has been carried on by the various sub-committees, and as their reports have been made to the Executive Committee. As the report proceeds, you will become aware of the excellent work which has been done by these sub-committees during the recent year.

Home Missions

The work of Home Missions in the Presbytery has gone forward in an excellent way. The greatest factor in this work continues to be the large number of consecrated, capable, and attractive pastors whom God has sent to work in our Presbytery. We should be grateful to Him for these men and their families, and for their spirit of sacrifice and devotion to the cause of Christ. To mention in details the achievements resulting from their leadership, the contribution they are making to the work of our Presbytery and to the Kingdom of God would make this report unduly long.

Three changes have taken place since our last report. Dr. J. M. Waggett gave up the work at Southport and New Hope churches to return to Hartwell, Georgia, and the Rev. Joseph B. MacLeod, a recent graduate of Columbia Seminary, has accepted the calls of these churches. The Rev. Lardner C. Moore resigned his work at Cape Fear Church to accept appointment as a missionary under the Board of World Missions, and the Rev. James A. Marrow, Jr., a former member of this Presbytery, has accepted a call to this church. The Rev. J. D. Withrow resigned the pastorate of the Woodburn church to work in Fayetteville Presbytery, and the Rev. J. Clyde Plexico has accepted the call of this church. It is understood, of course, that each of these calls has been accepted subject to the approval of Presbytery. It is interesting to note that all Home Mission fields and churches have had the full time services of pastors during the year, which is one of the reasons why progress can be noted in the various fields.

These things should be mentioned relative to building programs within the Presbytery. The Jacksonville church recently received the generous gift of a lot where a larger and more adequate plant may be built to meet the pressing needs of that congregation. The Trinity Church, at Havelock, and the Acme Church have building programs in the planning stage. Two other churches, not receiving aid from this Committee in the support of their pastors, but churches in which your Committee is keenly interested, namely, Bethany and Westminster, have building projects under way.

Members of your Committee have studied one of the growing residential areas in Wilmington, looking to the purchase of a suitable site for a church when the way be clear.

Thus far this year your Committee has received, for the work under its direction, a total of \$13,861.61. It has allocated funds to the amount of \$20,883.00. A report of receipts and allocations is attached but will not be read unless request is made for its reading.

Your Committee offers the following recommendations:

1. That the title to the manse property used by the pastor of Acme and Ashwood churches be transferred from the Trustees of Wilmington Presbytery to the Trustees of the Acme Church, and that the Trustees of the Presbytery, Walter P. Sprunt, James H. Clark, and J. K. Bannerman be authorized and empowered to effect this change of title.
2. That pastors and elders be on the lookout for needs and opportunities for outpost Sunday Schools and Chapels. (At present there are only five chapels reported by the churches of this Presbytery.)
3. That the members of Presbytery continue to remember the pastors of our Home Mission fields in their prayers.

Evangelism

Cooperation in the field of Evangelism has been noted in the life of the Presbytery. Many of the ministers of Presbytery attended the Conference on Evangelism sponsored by Synod's Committee in Raleigh in February of this year.

Many of the ministers and churches are entering eagerly into the exchange of ministers for Evangelistic Services to be held in the Synods of Virginia and North Carolina in 1955. Any minister, who has not availed himself of this opportunity of service, should do so at once.

During the year 1953, a nine month year, 285 persons were received on Profession of Faith, and 448 by letter or reaffirmation of Faith.

Negro Work

As was reported last year, the Sub-Committee on Negro Work, in conjunction with a committee of the First Church, Wilmington, invited the Rev. Lawrence Bottoms, Assistant Director of Negro Work of the Board of Church Extension, to come to Wilmington for a survey of the needs and opportunities for additional religious work among the Negroes of that city. At the conclusion of the survey he recommended work for Negroes in the South Side of Wilmington. In April of this year, Mr. Bottoms returned to Wilmington at which time efforts were made to purchase a site for locating a church. Efforts to obtain the site which had been chosen were unsuccessful. There has been no further action on this matter.

Christian Relations

In view of the action taken by Presbytery, the report of the sub-committee on Church Relations will not be made.

The Council of the Presbytery through the chairman, Rev. Samuel M. Houck, made the following recommendations, which were adopted:

1. That a conference on the work of the Presbytery be held September 13, 1954, in the St. Andrews-Covenant Church, from 3:00—8:00 p.m. (See Manual, Sec. IV, pg. 7.)

2. That in view of the action of the Synod relative to the Committee on Christian Education and Educational Institutions, a committee of Presbytery be appointed to make such revisions in our Manual as will bring our Presbytery organization in line with that of Synod, and that this committee report at the next Stated meeting of the Presbytery.

3. That the Presbytery approve the "Forward with Christ" movement in our Church as the program of special emphasis for the next three years, and that the Council of Presbytery be authorized to promote this program in all of our churches.

4. That the provision of the Manual relative to the date of meeting of Presbytery (Section 11, pg. 1) be waived for the next Stated meeting and that this meeting be held September 28th, rather than October 19th.

5. Ministers, with elders who were representing their Session for the first time, introduced these Ruling Elders to the Presbytery.

The Stated Clerk presented a docket to the Presbytery which was amended and adopted.

Communications were read and disposed of as noted: From the Rev. J. T. Hayter, requesting a letter of dismissal to the Presbytery of Montgomery, in order that he may accept calls to churches in that Presbytery. The request was granted and the Stated Clerk authorized to send such a letter.

From the Stated Clerk of General Assembly, proposed changes in the Book of Church Order, referred to a committee on Bills and Overtures, with recommendation that they report at the January meeting of the Presbytery.

From D. T. Brandenburg, Stated Clerk of the Synod of Kentucky, a letter from the Synod of Kentucky requesting that the Presbyteries consider carefully the effects of the Reunion of the Presbyterian Churches on Border Synods, received as information.

The Report of the Council of the Presbytery was presented by the chairman, Rev. Samuel M. Houck, and was adopted as follows:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF PRESBYTERY

The Council of the Presbytery brings its report to you with mingled emotions. We are both grateful to God and penitent before Him.

We are grateful for the evident mood of expansiveness in our Presbytery. Our churches are generally under the oversight of pastors and are carrying on programs which are designed to make the mission of the church more effective in the life of all to whom the church ministers.

Our rolls of membership are larger than ever before. Our Sunday school enrollment is greater than ever before. Our Spiritual birthrate is second highest in the Synod of N. C. Our Sunday school enrollment figures show a percentage growth second largest of any Presbytery in the Synod. These show that our Presbytery is a growing Presbytery.

Our program of Evangelism and of Home Missions grow upon us. For all of these things, we give thanks to God who calleth men through His Spirit to repentance and faith.

In the work of education our Presbytery seems to be showing signs of increased concern and effective work. Our youth conferences, both Pioneer and Senior High groups, have shown increased interest as is evident in the enlarged enrollment at camps and conferences and at the Spring rallies. The adult work of the Presbytery seems to be on the "forward march" as is evident in the largest men's rally ever held and the increased interest of churches in men's groups and in the newly organized Presbytery work for Young Adults. Of the work of the women of the church we need only remind you of the report given to our Presbytery by the President of the Women of the Presbytery at our January meeting to show its growth.

Leadership training schools are being held and well attended in various areas of the Presbytery. And to assist in leadership development the Committee on Christian Education is setting up teacher consultants in the various divisions of the church school to help teachers in local churches with

their problems. We are grateful for the excellent help given to us through the Area Worker, Mrs. William Morton, in this work.

In the other areas of the life of the Church, our Presbytery has shared in the tasks of the Synod and the General Assembly in a way which evidences our continuing and growing concern for the total program of the church. All of these things point up the fact that in our Presbytery we are a living and growing organism within the framework of the Presbyterian Church and within the larger framework of the Church Universal. For all of these marks of growth we are grateful.

But we are also penitent. For while we are growing in numbers and in other areas, we are not so sure that our Christian Witness to the world is of such a nature that our Christianity is making the impact it ought to make upon the society in which we are cast. Many problems face the Christian conscience upon which the Church ought to make its witness known. Of these we mention only a few.

First of all we mention the fact that with increased enrollment and increased membership we do not seem to have integrated these enrolled into the total life of the church. Our evangelistic task must begin once again with the Household of God, the Church, until we have brought the minds and hearts of all within our membership under subjection to the mind of Christ. And in this area we need to show a spirit of charity and of understanding for those with whom we may differ in ways which are deep and significant. Christians of all persons ought to be able to "love one another" and show regard for the viewpoints of one another, while we seek together the mind of the Spirit of God who reveals truth to us. We call upon Sessions and Church members generally to bear in mind that the conscience of a man is responsible unto God alone, and that the breaking of the middle wall of partition by the Cross of Christ makes of two one in Christ.

We would also call to the attention of the Session of the churches of the Presbytery to the problem of alcohol education, and urge that they secure and study the report of the Ad Interim committee presented to and adopted by the Synod of N. C. at its meeting in July of this year.

We would urge also that Session become once again interested in the family life of the members of the churches over which God has placed you. Problems of divorce, broken homes, sexual laxity, all are of concern to the Church and the Sessions of the churches are especially responsible to inform themselves and be of assistance to all church families which need help. We suggest that a revitalized church might come about through the officers of the church if Par. 43 in the Book of Church Order were taken seriously.

Yet another problem presents itself to our church members and to our congregations. This is the problem of our stewardship of possessions. According to the department of commerce of the U. S. Government, the average income for N. C. is almost \$1,100 per capita. Now if we take our membership and multiply that by the average income for N. C. we get the staggering figure of \$13,000,000. A tithe of this amount would be \$1,300,000. Yet last year we gave to the church in all phases of its work less than \$500,000. This is only four percent of our income and less than a half of the tithe. Last year, we gave a total of \$40.96 per member to the church. In total giving to benevolences, we ranked 65th among the 84 Presbyteries, giving \$10.92 per member to Benevolences. The average of the General Assembly for all giving was \$57.31 and for Benevolences \$13.93.

Your council does not believe that this reflects the economic position of the area served by our Presbytery in relation to other areas of our church, nor do we believe that it reflects what the Presbyterians of this Presbytery want to do and can do in the Cause of Christ and His Kingdom. We remind you that stewardship is a vital part of spiritual growth and that God's Word teaches the title as the beginning of our responsibility.

Your Council has sought to carry out the task assigned us at the January meeting relative to finding a grouping for the Teachey Church in order that the Mt. Zion church could have more of the time of the Pastor. So far we have not been able to come to a definite conclusion with the churches concerned, but are praying that God will give us guidance as we counsel with these churches.

We make the following recommendations:

6. That the Treasurer of Presbytery's Contingent Fund be authorized to pay the assessment of our Presbytery for Inter-Church agencies in the Synod, i.e., the N. C. Council of Churches and the Allied Church League from Presbytery's contingent fund. (This is \$194.00).
7. That every church place special emphasis upon the Stewardship season this year, conducting an Every Member Canvass and giving to every member of each church an opportunity to respond to the claims of Christ upon their money as well as their life.
8. That these budget figures shall be the total amounts expected from Our Presbytery this year. (The Session and Board of Deacons may secure the funds either through regular contributions or supplemental offerings as they deem wise, and that all contributions be sent through the Central Treasurer.)
9. That local churches be urged to consider the advantages of the Unified Budget for all organizations within the church.
10. We recommend that the Presbytery appoint a "Forward with Christ" committee to be composed of the following persons: The Chairman of the Committee on Church Extension (a) Chairman of the sub-committee on Home Missions and (b) Chairman of the sub-committee on Evangelism, Chairman of the Committee on World Missions, Chairman of the Committee on Christian Education, Chairman of the Committee on Higher Education, Chairman of the Council of Presbytery, President of Men of the Church, President of Sunday School Superintendents, President of Youth Council, and Representative of the Women of the Church. This committee so composed report at the January meeting of the Presbytery definite goals for our Presbytery for this three year period.
11. That the attention of Sessions be called to the "Church Planning Committee" which was approved by the last Assembly, and where needed, such a committee be appointed in local churches.
12. That the allocation to the office of Stated Clerk of Presbytery be raised from \$300 to \$600.
13. That we authorize the Central Treasurer of Benevolences to hold 8% of all undesignated funds to be divided at the end of each quarter among those causes which have not received a proportionate share of the total gifts to Benevolences. Distribution to be made by the Executive Committee of the Council. This percentage to be reported by the Central Treasurer to the churches on the Benevolence Receipt blanks as "Equalization Fund."

Presbyterian Orphan's Home

With the exception of a brief vacation during the summer, Barium Springs is a twelve months operation. As soon as school closes in the spring the boys and girls are assigned to their summer program and are kept unusually busy until school opens again in the fall.

Approximately thirty children have been admitted to the Home during the 1954 summer. Applications are on file for more spaces than are available.

At the beginning of the fall term, the staff at Barium Springs was the most nearly complete that it has been in a long time. A purchasing agent has been secured and the total buying of the institution will be done by him. Housemothers and supervisors sufficient to carry the load are on the job. The administrative force of the business office and the case work is excellent.

The Home is now in the process of erecting some Children's Cottages. These buildings have been in the planning for over twelve years, but the money has not been available for their erection. The original plan called for five buildings and money is in hand to erect only two. These new cottages will adequately care for sixteen children each and will be low one-story, fire proof buildings, made as homelike as possible for the use of the boys and girls who live in them.

The new church building is underway and will be ready for use in the summer of 1955. The new minister for the church is the Rev. Robert R. Collins who comes to Barium Springs from Sylva, N. C. where he was serving his first pastorate.

The Home has no debt and neither does it have any wealth except in the thousands of people who each year provide for the annual operation of the Home. The budget for the current year is almost identical with that of last year; therefore, the income anticipated cannot be less and meet the needs.

The entire force at Barium Springs is particularly conscious of the fact that the hand of God continues to work in the life of this Home and would earnestly request every person who loves this place to offer a prayer daily that the Will of God may be done in the lives of the boys and girls and that the leadership of this place may exemplify Jesus Christ before the student body.

Presbyterian Home, Inc.

The Board of Trustees respectfully reports the following major activities of the Presbyterian Home, Inc. during the past short year.

The Home opened its doors on January 21, 1952 and by November 4th of that year had reached its capacity of 24 members. During two and one-half years of operation, there have been only four deaths. At the present time there are 45 members living in the Home with at least two persons from each Presbytery of Synod.

In 1951, the Board of Trustees asked for and received permission to proceed with the building of the second unit of the Home. On November 11, 1953, there was a cornerstone laying ceremony preceding the regular quarterly board meeting. On May 1, 1954, the new building was opened and new members started coming in. Within the next couple of months they will have reached their capacity of approximately 60 members.

On September 26, 1954, the formal opening of the second unit of the Home was held. Dr. James A. Jones delivered the principal address on this occasion.

William Black Home

The William Black Home was opened for the reception of guests June 1 this year under the efficient management of Mrs. Pauline A. Allen, Miss Lucy Alexander and Miss Sara Lytch. Thirty-four Commissioners of the General Assembly were entertained.

Last season the Home gave a week of free entertainment to eight of our Home Mission workers. This year they invited forty of our faithful and consecrated Home Missionaries to spend a week at Montreat as the guests of the William Black Home. Presbyterians of the Synod of North Carolina are being furnished room and board at \$3.50 per day. This is made possible by the gifts of friends, income of the Home, and the budget of Synod.

All obligations of the Home have been promptly met and it is free of debt. Considerable work in and around the Home is yet to be done which will require a sizeable outlay, but the Board of Directors are confident that the friends of the Home and the Synod will continue their faithfulness in the support of this most worthy institution.

Rev. S. N. Thomas again took the chair and the report of the committee on Special Causes, Rev. G. B. Williams, chairman, made its report. The report was adopted and is as follows:

The American Bible Society

Last year the Society placed 15,476,391 Bibles, Testaments, and Portions around the world. It produced a film, "Our Bible—How It Came to Us." The General Assembly placed \$35,000.00 in the 1955 Budget for this Cause.

The Historical Foundation

The new Historical Foundation Building has been completed at Montreat, N. C., at a saving of \$20,000.00. The Rev. Thomas H. Spence, Jr., was elected as Director of the Foundation for a three-year term.

Montreat

Sunday, May 29, 1955 has been designated as Montreat Day. Pastors and Sessions are asked to publicize this day and to remember Montreat and its needs in prayer.

The ad interim committee appointed at last year's General Assembly came to no agreement as to the place of Montreat College in the educational program of the church. This question was committed to an ad interim committee for still another year for study with report to be made at the 1955 Assembly. The Assembly placed \$50,000.00 in its budget for the College for this year.

Stillman College

Stillman College was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools this year. It is at the present time carrying on the construction of two dormitories and a library building. \$135,000.00 was added to the permanent endowment fund together with sufficient funds for the three new buildings from the successful Negro Work Campaign last year. A new charter was adopted by the Assembly.

Stillman failed to receive \$17,854.00 from its assigned operating expense quota from the General Fund of the Assembly.

The services of the College continue to grow. Last year students were enrolled from all but two of the Synods of the Assembly.

The Lord's Day Alliance

The General Assembly placed in the 1955 budget the amount of \$1,000.00 for the support of this Cause.

Assembly's Training School

Sunday, April 17, 1955, has been set aside as Assembly's Training School Day in the local churches. Churches are urged to use this day to become acquainted with the service being rendered by this institution in educating Directors of Christian Education.

The School had 100 students enrolled during this past year, including 5 men students.

A new Administration Building was erected without debt at a total cost of \$300,000.00. An additional residence for a professor was also erected, and other improvements on the campus were made. Total assets were increased by \$115,357.73.

The examination on Sacraments and Church Government was conducted by the Rev. M. J. McChesney and was sustained.

The examination on English Bible was conducted by the Rev. W. P. Conyers III, and was sustained.

A Diploma from Union Theological Seminary was accepted in lieu of examination on academic studies and the original languages of Scripture.

Mr. Perkins preached a sermon using as his text Isaiah 52:13, 53:12, which was accepted by the Presbytery.

The examination as a whole was sustained and Mr. Perkins was enrolled as a member of the Presbytery after his licensure. The examination for licensure was accepted as the examination for ordination and the following commission was appointed to complete the proceedings in accordance with the provisions of the Book of Church Order, in the First Presbyterian Church, Wilmington, Sunday, October 10, at 11:00 a.m. Dr. L. A. Taylor, Dr. B. F. Hall, and Rev. C. C. Myers, Ruling Elder W. M. Dickson. Mr. Perkins is to be ordained as an evangelist and is given permission to labor outside the bounds of the Presbytery as he completes his fellowship year at the Union Theological Seminary.

Rev. W. H. Allison presented to the Presbytery Mr. Fenton Miller as a candidate for the ministry to be taken under the care of Presbytery.

The examination on Experimental Religion and Motives for seeking the Ministry was conducted by the Rev. M. C. MacQueen and was sustained.

The Moderator proposed the questions to the candidate and after these were answered in the affirmative, the Rev. L. A. Taylor gave a charge to Mr. Miller. The proceedings were closed with prayer by the Moderator and Mr. Miller was enrolled as a candidate for the ministry under the care of the Presbytery.

The minutes of the commission to install Rev. J. A. Marrow as Pastor of the Cape Fear Church were read and admitted to record as follows:

The Commission appointed by Wilmington Presbytery to install Rev. James A. Marrow, Jr. as Pastor of the Cape Fear Presbyterian Church met in the Pastor's study July 25th, 1954, at 7:45 p.m.

MINUTES OF WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

b—*Christian Education*—To promote the causes of Christian Education (Assembly, Synod, Presbytery). It shall receive reports from all sources on the activities of Campus Christian Life and keep the work of this cause before the Presbytery. It shall have the direct contacts with and supervision of Candidates for the Ministry and shall approve all applications for Loans from the Student Loan Fund of the Assembly.

This committee shall be composed of five ministers and four lay persons elected by the Presbytery. Sub-committees to carry on the work of the divisions of the Committee on Higher Education may be appointed by the Chairman.

This committee shall meet at least annually and at the call of the chairman. It shall make an annual written report to the Presbytery and verbal reports as occasions may arise.

Presbytery excused the members of the Committee on Higher Education to meet with a young man seeking admission to the Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry.

Ruling Elders representing Sessions at a meeting of Presbytery for the first time were introduced by their respective pastors, and welcomed to Presbytery.

A docket was presented to the Presbytery, amended and adopted.

The following communications were read:

From Rev. W. P. Conyers III, requesting that the pastoral relations between himself and the First Presbyterian Church of Morehead City and the Wildwood churches be dissolved, and that he be given a letter of dismissal to Kings Mountain Presbytery. After hearing from the churches concurring in the request, Presbytery granted the request.

Presbytery took note of the irregularity in the action of the First Presbyterian Church of Morehead City in calling a pastor before the relations between itself and the former pastor were dissolved by the Presbytery, and the following resolution was adopted:

"That the irregularity be called to the special attention of the Commission on the Minister and His Work, with the request that every precaution be taken to guard against a recurrence of this procedure."

Presbytery then ratified the call of the Congregation to Rev. Albert G. Harris, Jr., effective after the dissolution of the pastoral relationship with Mr. Conyers. A request from Candidate G. Fenton Miller that he be given a letter of dismissal to the Presbytery of Harmony, Synod of S. C. was granted.

A letter from Dr. Claude H. Pritchard reporting on the work of Chaplain P. C. Oliver was referred to the Committee on Church Extension.

A communication from the Synod of Texas relative to the Union of the Presbyterian churches was referred to the Committee to study the plan of union, to be read in connection with that report.

A special committee to study the salaries of Ministers, Mr. George Mitchell, chairman, sent in a written report which was adopted as follows:

Referring to your joint communication on September 8, 1954, advising as to action taken by Wilmington Presbytery at its July 1954 meeting on the subject of minimum salaries of Ministers and as to appointment by the Moderator of a committee to go into the subject of a further step-up in minimum salaries of Ministers in the Presbytery, that is, for married Ministers from \$3,600 to \$3,900 per annum, plus manse, plus Annuity Fund payment, and for single Ministers from \$3,300 to \$3,600 plus Annuity Fund payment; also to our several discussions of the matter:

I find that I will have to be in Chicago on the date of the January meeting of Wilmington Presbytery and cannot report in person for the Committee; therefore, I am hereby submitting its report. All churches in Wil-

mington Presbytery which did not conform to the higher minimum salaries when adopted by Presbytery last July are now meeting the present, higher, applicable minimum salaries, in view of which attainment the Committee respectfully requests its discharge.

The Permanent committee on World Missions presented its annual report which was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON WORLD MISSIONS TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY—JANUARY 18, 1955

The mission work of our Church beyond our national borders is too vast and too variegated to be presented vividly and impressively in a report spottedly covering the whole, and given in a few minutes. The additions of new fields of work, and changing problems in the old fields demand a continuing and continuous attention to this great field of our Church's responsibility. Only brief comment will be made on our several fields.

Africa: In our ten stations, in a field of 1,800,000 people, we have 156 foreign workers, 71,486 communicants, with 4,204 additions last year.

Some encouraging features of this work are: The increasing maturity of the native Church, an increased activity and interest of the young people, and for the women, in the Church's program, and the growth in educational work.

Discouraging features are: Those conditions always posed by heathenism, complicated by a mixture of materialistic Western Civilization, which is infiltrating the jungle, with its Western sins and the old gods of money and pleasure, dressed in Western garb of modern design; and the hard indifference that grows out of this state of things.

Brazil: Our three missions in Brazil, with a native Church behind them, a native Church that has grown out of mission work, but now independent and growing in vision and accomplishment, are devoting their energies principally to enlarging and strengthening their educational institutions, and trying to keep up with the opportunities for new work in the rapidly developing new frontiers of the country. An air plane is used to reach new towns that are out of reach by highway.

Population of our field 5,000,000, foreign workers 69, about 5,400 communicants, additions last year 864. These figures do not include any members of the native Church.

China-Formosa: Some of our missionaries who had to leave China when the field was closed, are now in Formosa. They first worked with Canadian Presbyterian missionaries, but recently our own work has been organized

there. This work is among three separate groups of people: The ancient people of the island, the descendants of Chinese immigrants and the Chinese refugees from the mainland.

Japan: The recovery of national spirit of the Japanese from the shock of defeat and occupation is changing the attitude somewhat of the Japanese toward the Americans. However, a Japanese has more freedom in turning from Buddhism or Shintoism than he had before the war.

Evangelistic work goes on in all fields, a new feature being the use of radio broadcasts of the Gospel, which have proven effective.

Educational work centers in four important colleges and schools.

Medical work is just beginning.

More mission personnel is needed, and more boarding homes for Christian students attending government schools.

Korea: The national Church has suffered a division, which has been hurtful; but which shows signs of lessening. Bible schools and Bible study are still points of great emphasis.

In medical work the Mission has worked in three special fields, beside its general practice: With amputees, with lepers and with tubercular patients.

Relief work has been a large feature.

Mexico: Two trends are noticeable here: Increased activity of the Roman Catholic Church and lessened persecution of Protestants.

There has been some tension within the National Presbyterian Churches down there, but it appears that no split will occur. Mexicans are people who take their convictions seriously and they make strong and loyal Presbyterians.

Our Mission works closely with the National Church and the evangelistic work is encouraging.

Our educational work centers in religious schools, the seminary, in which we participate, and the Bible schools and in boarding homes for Christian students at government schools.

Our medical work has grown very much. The new hospital in Morelia is a splendid institution. Room for 90 patients, 4 doctors (native), a Nurses Training School, affiliated with the University, and dental service. In Ometepepec, Dr. Boyce is doing a fine clinical work and by plane he visits remote villages, healing bodies and breaking down prejudice against the Gospel.

In collaboration with other Churches we have work in Portugal and Equador. Rev. Herbert Meza, for a while minister in our church at Jacksonville, is our representative in the seminary in Portugal.

The work in Equador is among the Quecha-speaking Indians of the Piqualqui tribe, who live high up in the Andes mountains, 8 to 15 thousand feet. They are aloof, sullen and suspicious of white men. They have had plenty of reason for being so. Our work has gone on in teaching better agriculture, health work and schools to improve the life of the people and win their confidence. Some of them have been baptized.

Overseas Relief: This is a department of our World Missions. Our Church is one of those which form CHURCH WORLD SERVICE, and our relief work is done through this agency. Many of our missionaries aid in the distribution of goods and various supplies. Our Church recommends

contributing through this agency rather than through numerous others which advertise very much. Through this agency we administered:

Funds	\$138,786.39
Estimated value of material relief.....	196,000.00
Estimated value of Crop.....	15,000.00

This committee recommends:

1. That the special season of prayer and self-denial for World Missions be observed and the study of World Missions be studied as the General Assembly recommends.

2. That Presbytery request the Men of the Church of the Presbytery, and the Young People of Presbytery with their advisors to consider arranging for the theme of the program of their Presbytery-wide rallies be World Missions at least once in three years and bring this to the attention of the Presbyterian Education Committee.

3. That individual churches consider adopting special commitments or specific projects for their gifts to support.

4. That Presbytery send to the World Mission Conference at Montreat, at its expense, one boy or girl who is especially interested in World Missions, preferably a sophomore or junior in college and who is well recommended by his or her college.

The Committee on Woman's Work, Rev. J. W. Ware, chairman, presented Mrs. E. N. Pittman, President of the Women of Wilmington Presbytery, who made the annual report for the committee. The report was adopted by a standing vote and is as follows:

I regret exceedingly that my first report to you as President of the Women of the Church of Wilmington Presbytery, must be incomplete. The yearly reports from the local churches, due January 15th, are coming in rapidly, but have not yet been tabulated. I can, however, report that in a general way, much has been accomplished in this small part of our Master's kingdom. Our women have been devoted and busy and we have prospered under God's guiding hand and for that we give grateful thanks.

I am happy to be able to report two new groups in our Presbyterial family, the recently organized group at the Westminster Church in Wilmington and the re-activated group in the Elkton Presbyterian Church. We welcome them into the fellowship of service. This increases our total to seventy-five groups, divided into 185 circles. We feel concern that there are seven churches still without an organization for their women. Some of these are served with "contact women" and we are hoping that as a result they may yet be organized.

At our Birthday observances in May, \$1,859.07 was given for the three objectives: Goodland Orphanage in Oklahoma, Guerrant Presbytery in Kentucky and Radio and Television Center in Atlanta. The amount was an increase over last year of \$59.00. We are grateful for the increase but feel that our per capita giving among our women is still far too small. Many groups used the film, "Now and Tomorrow" as a part of their program and found it very effective.

During World Mission emphasis in February, Dr. and Mrs. Joseph Hopper of our Korean Mission were in our Presbytery. Dr. Hopper made an intensive itinerary of our churches and communities and brought his challenging messages to 61 groups. Results are still being felt in an awakened awareness of the work and needs of these "Ambassadors for Christ" and the fields and people they serve in other lands.

In May a special meeting of the Executive Board was held to consider Dr. Herbert Coddington's request that we share some of our Kiangyin Hospital Fund with Korea. Mrs. Farrior explained to you last year about this fund. Dr. Coddington wanted to use this money to purchase equipment needed in the hospital and mission in Korea. The Board took favorable action and \$2,000.00 was given to the work there. This reduces our fund to \$828.68.

Christian service, as truly as other forms of service, requires preparation and training. This is offered at our splendid training schools. 16 of our women took advantage of the study and inspiration offered at the Synodical Training School at Peace College in June; 18 attended the Women's Conference at Montreat and most thrilling of all, 25 splendid negro women were helped to go for training for service to their people at the Christian Conference for Negro Women at Winston-Salem in June.

The sixty-sixth annual meeting was held at St. Andrews-Covenant Church February 1st and 2nd with an almost record attendance of 438, 64 out of the 73 groups were represented.

The sixty-seventh annual meeting was held in the Wallace Church on October 21 and 22. The Executive Board at this meeting heard of the completion of the project for the year; the raising of \$1,500.00 for the Peace College Campus Improvement Fund, and \$300.00 for added furnishing at William Black Home in Montreat. The Board approved the Synodical recommendation that the raising of \$10,000.00 for the Lucy Steele Memorial Fund be the project for the next two years. The Board then voted to accept our Wilmington Presbyterian's proportionate part, which is the raising of \$10,000.00 during the next two years.

The District Days of Prayer will be held during the first two weeks of March. The District Chairman met last week and planned an interesting and deeply spiritual program. These "Days of Prayer" are powerhouses of spiritual strength for our work in the Presbyterial.

We give God grateful thanks for what has been accomplished this year. The year has been fruitful and encouraging. Yet, as we view the work, we realize that we have failed often, much has been neglected and many mistakes made. We also realize that we have many needs. We need a deeper and more intelligent understanding among our women of our organization, our work and our responsibilities. We need a broader outlook and outreach to see beyond the bounds of our own church. We need more women attending our Training Schools for instruction and inspiration. We are not going to go "Forward With Christ" until we are interested enough and informed enough to be found serving through the whole program of our church. We need every woman recognizing and assuming her responsibility and, above all, more dedicated service to our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ.

With a new sense of unity gained from our study of Ephesians, we are praying for an ever enlarging conception of the "Task of the Church." As we learn this year about "Living the Faith" and "Love in the New Testa-

ment," we feel sure that the result will be deepened personal faith and greater joy in His service.

MRS. E. N. PITTMAN

Rev. Wade H. Allison, chairman of the committee on Higher Education, reported that the committee had examined all papers in connection with the request of Richard Bethune to be received under the care of Presbytery as a candidate for the Ministry and found them in order. The committee recommended that Mr. Bethune be examined by the Presbytery, and the recommendation was adopted.

Mr. Bethune was examined on Experimental Religion and Motives for Seeking the Gospel Ministry by the Rev. M. C. MacQueen, and the examination was sustained.

The Constitutional questions were propounded by the Moderator and after being answered affirmatively, a charge was delivered to the candidate by Dr. P. H. Gwynn. The proceedings were closed with prayer by Dr. L. A. Taylor. Richard Bethune was enrolled as a candidate for the Ministry under the care of the Presbytery.

Rev. F. C. Hutcheson was asked to preside.

From the Stated Clerk relative to the recent death of Rev. George B. Williams, requesting that a person be appointed to draw up suitable resolutions of respect to be presented to the Presbytery at the July meeting. The request was granted, and Ruling Elder M. L. McClimon of the Trinity Church, Havelock, was asked to draw up such resolutions.

The Committee on Christian Education made its report. Pending the adoption of the report, Miss Doris Lynch, new area worker for the Presbyteries of Albemarle and Wilmington, was introduced to the Presbytery and spoke briefly on her work. Also, Rev. J. C. McCann spoke on the value of Clinics in the Church School. Mr. C. F. Mallard, Jr., chairman of the Presbytery Superintendent's Conference spoke on the Montreat Conference for Superintendents and Mr. James Harris made an announcement of the Men's Conference at Davidson College, June 10-12, 1955. The report, with its recommendations was adopted as follows:

SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION TO THE PRESBYTERY OF WILMINGTON

Since our former report to you the Executive Committee of Christian Education has met twice as a full committee. Eleven of our members were present in November and 12 in March. Minutes of these meetings have been filed with the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery and may be examined by anyone wishing to see them.

Generally, the program of Christian Education has shown improvement over the past year, at least in numbers, and we trust in effectiveness. From the Sessional reports, we learn that we have had an increase in enrollment in our Church schools of almost 1,000 persons during the past year with the total enrollment now at 11,188. Last year we were grieved to report to you that the average attendance was only 4,741, while this year the reports show an average attendance of 7,426. We hope that this report is fairly accurate and that this increase in average attendance is indicative of a growing interest on the part of Sessions and of officers and teachers in our Church schools in effective teaching. We also call to your attention that the average attendance is still less than 70% of the enrollment and feel that the job of increasing attendance of those already enrolled is not done.

In order to do its work effectively, the committee is organized into several sub-committees each with a particular area of interest and responsibility.

The sub-committee of Children's work is responsible for Daily Vacation Church schools, Church school institutes, Children's work counselors and contact persons in each church, and seeks to promote clinics within local churches for Children's workers. Last year we held 48 Bible schools with an enrollment of 3,363, which compares with 44 schools and 2,693 enrolled in 1953. Clinics were conducted by Mrs. Jane Chamblee Morton in several Churches, and Churches were urged to make full use of the Area Worker in having clinics in your Church.

The Youth work sub-committee is responsible for the work done in Pioneer camps and conclaves, and in Senior High school fellowships and conference. Rallies and visitation are also a part of the work of this sub-committee. During the year past and again this year the members of the Presbytery's Youth council together with the adult advisors, Rev. Jack Ware and Mrs. M. C. MacQueen are visiting local churches upon invitation, to stimulate interest in the work of the Senior Hi fellowship. In the camps last year we had 205 Pioneers enrolled and in the conference at Flora MacDonald College we had 146 high school students enrolled. This year, because of the increased interest in Pioneer work, three camps are being planned. We are indebted to the leaders of this work for the time and energy they expend in promoting and guiding the work among our youth in the Presbytery.

The Adult work of the committee is in four parts. Men's work, which during the past year has shown increasing signs of life under the leadership of the Men's council of the Presbytery with Leslie Boney, Jr. as president. We realize that we still have far to go in the job of putting men to work in the Churches of our Presbytery, but we face the future with courage. District meetings of representatives from local Churches are being held under the leadership of District chairmen, and a rally for the fall is being planned in order that officers may be elected for the new Church year, 1956. Announcement of the details of the fall rally will be ready for the July meeting of Presbytery.

A second phase of Adult work is with the group now called "Young Adults." Several of our churches have organized classes for this group, and others have fellowship meetings of the Young Adults scheduled regularly. On a Presbytery basis, we have had two rallies of Young Adults since our last meeting of Presbytery and another is planned for May 1. Attendance has been good at both rallies and we confidently expect that this eager and energetic group of young Churchmen and women will make a large contribution to the spiritual interests of our Churches and our Presbytery in the future.

The third area of Adult work is in leadership training. During the year 50 of our Churches participated in area leadership schools. One such school held in Rose Hill, enrolled 187 persons. Plans are under way for this school to be held again this year in this area.

In the Whiteville area a school was held on four successive Sunday evenings with a part of the group meeting in one of the Whiteville Churches and another part in the other Whiteville Church. In the one group, three classes were offered: One for Church officers, one on Bible and one on Teaching children. The second group was for young people, and in this section of the school, regular programs of the Youth Fellowship and Pioneers fellowship were put on by local church groups, showing to the whole group how the program materials could be used in the Churches. In all, over 300 persons were enrolled in the school. Perhaps this offers ideas which other groups may wish to explore and use in the future.

The Wilmington area school enrolled 234 persons with an average attendance of 170 and 101 credits were issued for those completing the courses of study. Plans are under way already for the continuing of these area schools. We call to the attention of ministers and Sessions in other areas of the Presbytery the value of such schools and suggest that you make plans for the setting up of a school in your area. J. S. Walkup, chairman of the sub-committee on Leadership Training, will be glad to give any help he can in this venture.

The fourth area of responsibility in Adult work is with the Sunday school Superintendents. During this year, we have reorganized the Sunday school Superintendents of the Presbytery with Mr. C. Forrest Mallard, Jr., of Burgaw as president of the Superintendents Conference of the Presbytery. Plans are being made for district meetings of Superintendents in the near future, and promotion of the Montreat Conference for Superintendents is being carried on.

Your committee is aware that the organization of your Church school may not conform to the way in which our committee is organized, and that indeed it would not always be wise for you to have organizations for each age group or for each interested group. We do feel, however, that it is well for us to remind you of the various groups of persons within your Church school, and to remind you also that it is the responsibility of the Session of the Church to make provisions for meeting the needs of each group in your particular Church.

That Sessions may become aware of the task we suggest to you that you have within your church a planning committee whose task it shall be to make a thorough study first of all of your existing enrollment and organization, and of the programs now being carried on in your Church by each of the organizations in it. And then that this committee project plans for the future, setting up goals and standards which you will seek to attain. In order to do this, it is important that the group doing the planning take time

to do it well, and that it have some general idea at least of its purpose and function. It is possible that the planning group ought to be the Session itself. In other cases, probably a planning group ought to have in it members of each of the organizations of the Church concerned with the educational task of the Church, and these all meeting together and studying, the particular Church can coordinate plans and programs in such a way that the total program of the Church will be moving in one direction, even though every organization is not carrying on the same projects.

In order that this planning committee, whether it be of the Session or of a group appointed by the Session and responsible to it, may have some specific areas of responsibility before it. To begin with, we list four that are important. First of these areas is that of a knowledge of and appreciation for the Bible and the Revelation of God which is in it. It is here that the Church school meets its first responsibility. We are to teach growing minds to know Jesus Christ as Lord, and the same Jesus Christ who is portrayed for us in Scripture. To do this, we must be continually seeking to transfer the words of the Bible into the minds and lives of the persons whom we are seeking to teach until they are translated into life by those taught. An adequate knowledge of the Bible is essential to a continuing and growing protestantism and Presbyterianism. How is the Bible being used in your church school? How is it being taught? How much of it is getting over from the teacher to the pupil? These are matters we dare not leave to chance.

A second area in which the committee ought to feel concern is Churchmanship. The program of the Church as portrayed in the scriptures, and the program of the Church in our own day, together with their own place in that program is an essential part of the teaching function of the Church. Unless we train for loyalty to the Church along with commitment to Christ we have somehow left out an essential part of the total task of teaching. Elective courses in such areas as Church history, the program of the church, etc. are often a good way to meet this need. Your planning committee ought to place this item high on the list of things to look for in the program of your Church.

A third area of concern to the planning committee ought to be in the area of service to the community and to the world. Here we include the total program of evangelism in the local Church, stimulation of interest in the mission program of the Church both at home and to the ends of earth, and a sharing by the persons taught in this total program. Various methods may be pursued. Schools of missions, collection of clothing for needy persons, the support of missionary personnel in home of foreign lands, these and many others are all a part of the task of the Church school as it relates to the total program of the Church.

Last of all this planning committee ought to consider ways in which the corporate life of the congregation can be experienced by all within it. There is a continuing need for fellowship within the family of God collected together in the local church. And to the end that congregations may know each other, love and trust each other and work together in harmony in all things. It is essential that there be given to all within the congregation at least an occasional opportunity to see each other under informal circumstances and to enjoy each others company in Christian Fellowship.

Your committee cannot stress too much the importance of this planning being done, and of it being done with an eye to all the members of the congregation. Each group within the Church must be integrated into the total life of the congregation and become an active part of that life. The

responsibility for the making such a study and having such a planning group rests squarely upon the Sessions of the Churches. We trust that each Church Session will face up to the tremendous possibilities which are ours as we seek to make the teaching ministry of the Church effective as an instrument to the glory of God.

We offer the following recommendations:

1. That every Session make a study of the educational program now being carried on in the Church of which it is the Session, and seek to coordinate the work of the various organizations within the Church for a more effective work in the Church school and in the Church.

2. That Rev. Jack W. Ware, Rev. R. L. McBath and Rev. S. N. Thomas be approved as directors of Senior High conference, and of Pioneer camps for this summer.

3. That every Church plan to participate in a leadership school during the next 12 months, either in cooperation with other Churches in the area, or through leadership classes in the local Church itself, and that these leadership schools give recognition to young people in our Churches as well as adults.

4. That Presbytery authorize the Treasurer of Religious Education in the Presbytery to turn over to the Treasurer of the Committee on Christian Education such funds now held by him in that account, and that this account be closed, and the office of Treasurer of Religious Education of the Presbytery be discontinued.

5. That Presbytery approve the policy of the Executive Committee on Christian Education in putting all funds over and above operating expenses into a savings account to be used for the securing and the development of a camp and conference center in the Presbytery when the way is clear.

6. That the publication "Presbyterian Action" be used in our Church school, particularly by the leaders in the children's and young people's divisions.

7. That every Session in the Presbytery adopt the "Forward With Christ" program and make plans for meeting the goals set for your church in the area of Church school attendance and enrollment.

8. That every Church sponsor a Vacation Church school of at least ten sessions, and that leaders be secured for these immediately in order that the leaders may participate in the institute in Wallace, May 3.

9. That men's clubs or Men's Bible classes make available to worthy negro youth a scholarship to the Conference for Negro Youth to be held in Fayetteville in June. (The cost is about \$15.00.)

10. That the Presbytery recognize the excellent work done in our Churches by Mrs. Jane Chamblee Morton, and that the Stated Clerk be instructed to write her regarding our indebtedness to her, and that we welcome and commend to the Churches of the Presbytery Miss Doris Lynch, our new area worker who came to her task in April.

Presbytery took up the order of the day at 11:00. The committee to study the Plan of Union made its report which was received as information. Unlimited debate on the issue was voted by the Presbytery. During the debate, Presbytery recessed for lunch. During the lunch hour, the report of the Committee on Resolutions of thanks was read, and approved by a standing vote.

Presbytery reconvened at 2:00 p.m. with the singing of "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing," and prayer by Dr. E. D. Witherspoon. The vote on the categorical question was taken by roll call and voice vote, and was 47 voting "Yes", 51 voting "No." The following persons requested that their votes be recorded:

Voting "Yes:" L. C. Tucker, J. C. Plexico, J. B. MacLeod, Dr. E. D. Witherspoon, S. M. Houck, J. A. Marrow, W. H. Goodman, Jr., W. H. Allison, Fitzhugh Clark, Neill G. Stevens, M. C. MacQueen, Dr. B. Frank Hall, James T. Lewis, W. J. Elkins, M. L. McClimon, J. W. Kellog and Donald F. Townsend.

Voting "No:" F. A. Newman and A. C. Pate.

The following recommendations of the Committee of Church Extension were adopted:

The Home Missions Committee of Wilmington Presbytery presents to Presbytery the following recommendations:

1. That permission be given to the Home Missions Committee to borrow \$4,000.00 to assist the Acme Church in its building program.

2. That the Trustees of Presbytery, Walter P. Sprunt, James H. Clark and J. K. Bannerman, be authorized and empowered to issue a note for \$4,000.00 in favor of the Board of Church Extension, Presbyterian Church, U. S. and to secure the note with a deed of trust on some piece of property now owned by the Presbytery, the property to be selected by the Chairman. This money is to be used to assist the Acme Church in its building program.

3. That Presbytery approve the application of the Beulaville Church made to the General Assembly's Board of Church Extension for a loan of \$7,000.00.

4. That the Home Missions Committee be authorized to sell a lot, owned by the Presbytery and located in Havelock, N. C., for the sum of \$15,000.00.

5. That the Trustees of Presbytery, Walter P. Sprunt, James H. Clark and J. K. Bannerman, be authorized and empowered to transfer title to the lot from the Trustees of Wilmington Presbytery to MacMillan and Cameron Company of Wilmington, N. C.

6. That the proceeds from the sale of the lot be donated to the building fund of the Trinity Church, Havelock, N. C.

Rev. L. C. Tucker made the report for the Committee on Annuities and Relief. The report was adopted and is as follows:

TO THE PRESBYTERY OF WILMINGTON

The Presbytery's Committee on Annuities and Relief submits the following report to the Presbytery of Wilmington of the progress of this committee and the Board of Annuities and Relief for the year 1954.

The membership in the Ministers' Fund (Annuity) as of December 31, 1954, was 2,585. This is an increase of 129 over December 31, 1953. The number grows each year. Assets of this fund as of December 31, 1953 were \$14,401,327.26. As of December 31, 1954 it was \$16,010,675.57, an increase of \$1,609,348.31. This is a large sum of money but is the amount needed to provide the purchased annuities for members during their retirement. Since the beginning of the Ministers' Annuity Fund,

April 1, 1940 through December 31, 1954, we have paid out in annuities \$2,269,400.63. This has been paid to 458 ministers retired because of age, 68 ministers retired because of disability, 360 widows and 119 orphans.

In 1954 the Board supplemented from the funds of Ministerial Relief the annuities of 324 annuities to the extent of \$247,994.98. The total supplements paid since 1946 is \$1,028,669.69.

For 1955 the Board has increased the relief grants to many of our retired ministers and widows, where need seemed to justify such increases.

The committee believes the Ministers' Annuity Fund is in excellent condition.

The Employees' Annuity Fund began to function September 1, 1942 and as of December 31, 1954 we (Board) had 493 members enrolled. This is an increase of 51 over December 31, 1953. Since this fund began, 7 employees have retired because of age and 3 because of total and permanent disability. The Board feels that an inadequate job has been done in getting employees of the Church into the Employees' Annuity Fund and that every Church and every Church agency and institution should take more favorable action on this important phase of their work. Employees are going to get old, will have to be retired and if we are going to practice the social justice we have been preaching, we must do something for them at retirement. Would it not be better to have them enrolled in the Employees Annuity Fund and build up a retirement income over a long period of years than provide for them from the Church treasury over a few years?

Here we have one of the greatest opportunities for service and without this fund, (Relief Fund) most of which is created by the Joy Gift, 660 homes would have been without the necessities of life. Among these, 58 ministers, 246 widows, 16 orphans and 16 non-ministerial workers. These people were never participants in the Ministers' Annuity Fund. You would be interested to know that we have 8 widows between the ages of 90-97; 74 widows between 80-89; 100 widows between 70-79 and 34 widows between 60-69; one minister age 94; one minister age 91; 18 between 80-89; 27 between 70-79; 7 between 60-69. You can see from these ages that their needs for relief will be more, not less, as long as they live. For this reason we hope the Presbytery will increase their giving to the Joy Gift each year.

The Group Life and Hospitalization program is growing but much needs to be done to get all full-time employees of the Churches enrolled in this plan. We have at this time enrolled in the group life insurance plan 2,014, in the hospitalization 1,363, dependents 335. This is fine progress but we should not be satisfied until all of our eligible employees and ministers are enrolled in this plan. The officers and laymen of the Churches must take the initiative in this plan. The minister life insurance plan started on July 1, 1952 and the group hospitalization plan started October 17, 1953. They include three classes: (1) Ordained personnel, Heads of agencies and or institutions under 65 years of age. (2) Skilled Lay Personnel under 65 years of age. (3) a. Unskilled (all) Personnel with 6 months continuous service and b. all others age 65 and over. Since the beginning of these two plans we have paid 34 life insurance death claims totaling \$76,000.00 and 325 hospital claims for \$34,232.26. The importance of this program cannot be over emphasized. In regard to this report the committee heard at its annual meeting on March 14, Dr. L. A. Taylor, Executive Secretary of the Presbytery, tell of the critical illness of the Rev. George Williams of the Trinity Church, Havelock, N. C. He had con-

tracted leukemia and had a very short time to live. Mr. Williams case brings out the importance of our churches participating in the group insurance plan for its ministers. Mr. Williams or his family did not have the proper funds for this critical emergency. The congregation of the Trinity Church discharged a moral responsibility in providing for Mr. Williams to return to his home. The committee along with the Presbytery and the Home Mission Committee of the Presbytery took certain actions to aid the Rev. George Williams and his family in their critical emergency. The committee unanimously voted to recommend to the Synod's Committee on Annuities and Relief that they give Mr. Williams and his family aid or assistance from the Reynolds Fund as they deem wise or have funds available to do so; secondly, the committee recommended to the Board of Annuities and Relief that they consider his case and give him funds from "Relief" as they deem wise. The Committee also approved plans to inaugurate a program throughout the Presbytery, through the laymen of the Presbytery, to present this group life insurance program before congregations of our Presbytery.

The fifth opportunity in the Board of Annuities and Relief is the management of the Presbyterian Center, 341 Ponce de Leon Avenue, N. E., Atlanta, Georgia. The Board owns Presbyterian Center. All of the agencies of the Church with the exception of the Board of World Missions, Nashville, Tennessee, the Board of Christian Education, Richmond, Virginia and the Presbyterian Foundation, Charlotte, N. C. are housed in this center. It is an excellent piece of property and we are confident that, bringing these agencies together was a very constructive move for the Church.

Wilmington Presbytery supports two ministers on Ministerial Relief paying out a total of \$1,880.00. Four annuitants receive a total of \$2,975.00 from the Board of Annuities and Relief. Four ministers from our Presbytery receive distributions from the Reynolds Fund.

The Committee is grateful to each of you for the help and cooperation in making this report possible. With your help and prayers in 1955 we hope to reach a higher level of assistance to all whom we are privileged to aid.

Rev. Wade H. Allison made the report of the Committee on Christian Education. He presented to the Presbytery a recommendation that Mr. Adolf Otersen, Jr. be admitted to examination as a candidate for the Gospel Ministry. Mr. Otersen was introduced to the Presbytery by Dr. E. D. Witherspoon, pastor of Mr. Otersen. Mr. Otersen was admitted to examination. The examination on experimental religion and motives for seeking the Gospel Ministry was conducted by Rev. M. C. MacQueen and was sustained. The question to be asked of candidates were propounded by the Moderator, and Rev. R. L. McBath gave a charge to the candidate. The proceedings were closed with prayer by Rev. Wade H. Allison. The name of Mr. Adolf Otersen, Jr. was enrolled as a candidate for the ministry under the care of the Presbytery. The written report of the committee was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION

Your Executive Committee on Higher Education was organized as a separate committee at the January meeting of Wilmington Presbytery as a result of the action taken by Presbytery at its Fall meeting when it was decided to make the sub-committee on Higher Education under the Executive Committee on Christian Education a separate Committee.

We have not had occasion to meet as a whole since that time, but will meet before the next meeting of Presbytery to draw up recommendations to present to the Presbytery concerning reports involving our Presbytery which will be presented to the Synod in July.

The Chairman attended a meeting of Synod's Committee on Higher Christian Education in Chapel Hill on March 10th at which our Campus Christian Work at Six institutions were most encouraging, but in every instance plans for expansion and more effective service called for more financial assistance. We have 2,130 Presbyterian students in our state institutions in contrast to 1,291 Presbyterian students in all our Presbyterian schools in this state. Our Campus Christian Work is increasingly effective in reaching and ministering to our Presbyterian students in our state institutions. Our annual reports showed that Wilmington Presbytery has a total of 177 students in college. Of these, 45 or 25.4%, are in Presbyterian schools; while 92, or 52% are in state schools. You can readily see the necessity of our support of the Campus Christian Work to maintain the influence of the Church in the lives of these students during their stay in college.

At the present time, we have ten candidates for the ministry under our care. During the year, Richard Perkins was ordained and Fenton Miller was dismissed upon request to Pee Dee Presbytery. George Powell will graduate from Columbia Seminary next month and has accepted work in Athens Presbytery. All of the candidates are doing creditable work in the schools they are attending.

The Chairman also attended the meeting of Synod's Commission on Educational Institutions, which met in Charlotte April 5-7 to consider the report and recommendations of the Educational Institutions Survey made on the grant from the Ford Foundation. After meeting two and a half days the Commission was not able to complete its work and a committee of five was

appointed to consolidate the findings and bring in recommendations at a meeting to be held on April 28th.

In the matter of Presbyterian Christian Higher Education one thing is crystal clear. We have come to a junction of two ways. One leads to real Christian Education that inspires confidence and adequate support, that will attract our young people and command their respect; the other to a continuing struggle to maintain mediocrity, to a decreasing effectiveness, and finally to the inevitable death of a number of our institutions. We must face realistically the plight of our church-related schools, which has been brought on by inflation, the dwindling income from endowment, the competition with the tax-supported schools, and most certainly the indifference of the Church. We must recognize how imperative Christian Higher Education is to the Church in furnishing leadership and in propagating the Gospel, to our American way of life in preserving and strengthening our moral and spiritual values, to all higher education in maintaining academic freedom, and be ready to do whatever needs to be done.

Recommendation: Urge the Churches to pay their full benevolence Percentage to Educational Institutions.

At the request of this committee the provision in the manual relative to the meeting date for the summer meeting of Presbytery was waived, and the date for the summer meeting was set for June 28, 1955.

MEMORIAL TO REV. GEORGE B. WILLIAMS, JR.

The Reverend George B. Williams, Jr., active member of Wilmington Presbytery, died on March 30, 1955 from a four-months' illness of acute leukemia. His death occurred in the Veterans' Hospital, Houston, Texas, where he had been flown on March 7th from Bullock Hospital in Wilmington.

He was born in Houston, Texas May 18, 1922, and was a member of the Second Presbyterian Church, Houston before entering the ministry. He graduated from The Rice Institute in 1943 with a degree of Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering, worked as an engineer for Westinghouse Electrical Co. for two years. He then entered Union Theological Seminary, graduating with a Bachelor of Divinity Degree in 1948. While at the seminary, he received the Monroe Wicker Award for Outstanding Students and was on the first Evangelistic Team sent out by the seminary. He did summer work in Gaffney, South Carolina and the First Presbyterian Church in San Antonio, Texas. He was ordained in 1948 by the Presbytery of Western Texas and began serving immediately as Assistant Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of San Antonio, Texas.

In 1949 he accepted the call to the Harlandale Church of San Antonio. While there, he served as Moderator of the Presbytery of Western Texas, Adult Advisor to the Presbytery's Youth Council and Director of the Presbytery's Senior Summer Camps. He entered the Air Force Chaplaincy serving in Valdosta, Georgia and Montgomery, Ala. He then accepted the call to the Trinity Presbyterian Church of Havelock, N. C., where he was serving at the time of his illness. In the one year with Trinity Presbyterian church his forceful leadership did much for the church and community. One visible evidence of this is that although the church is 33rd in membership in Wilmington Presbytery it ranks 2nd in overall per capita giving.

He served as Moderator of the Presbytery at the July 1954 meeting and counceled in the Senior High Summer camp.

Memorial Services were held following a grave side committal at the Second Presbyterian Church in Houston, Texas, with the Reverend Mr. John P. Minter of Sherman, Texas officiating, assisted by Dr. James R. Bulluck, pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church, Houston. Memorial Services were also held at the Trinity Presbyterian Church, Havelock, N. C. on April 17, 1955. Survivors include: His wife, Mrs. Bernice Clark Williams; two sons, George Terrell and John Lawrence; all of San Antonio, Texas. His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. George B. Williams of Houston; one sister, Mrs. James U. Crockett of Concord, Mass.

Though the years of his ministry were brief, the power of his completely dedicated life has left an impact on his congregation, military and civilian, that will live on.

Request was granted and a letter of dismissal ordered sent.

The docket, prepared by the Stated Clerk, was presented to Presbytery and adopted.

A partial report of the Council of Presbytery was presented by the Chairman of the Council, the Rev. S. M. Houck and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY, JUNE 28, 1955

Since the report of the Council to Presbytery last September, one meeting of the Council has been held, at this meeting only 7 of the members were present. In addition to these, present by invitation were Mr. C. F. Mallard and Mr. A. L. Cavanaugh. The Executive Committee of the Council has also met once since that report.

The Past Year

From reports of the work done in our Presbytery last year, we are encouraged to give thanks to God for his blessings upon our efforts to "lengthen the cords and strengthen the stakes." Our churches were concerned with Evangelism and with Home Missions, with Christian Education and with the support of the benevolence program of the Church as a whole. For every evidence of a stronger work among the churches of the Presbytery, and of a greater interest in and concern for the work of the Church to the ends of the earth, we are thankful. You are reminded here that the summary report found on page 40 of the Minutes of the 189th and 190th sessions of the Presbytery ought to be studied, as ought the annual statistical report of the Presbytery to General Assembly; also to be found in that volume of the minutes of the Presbytery.

Forward With Christ

Many of the Churches of our Presbytery are enrolled in the FORWARD WITH CHRIST Program of our Assembly by official action of the Sessions of those Churches. However, it is likely that many of our Churches have not been so enrolled. We would remind you that this is the official program of General Assembly for the three year period 1955-1957, and that each Church is supposed to study the program, enroll in it and set its own goals within the framework of that program. No meeting of the committee appointed by the Presbytery last September has been held. However, the Council at its February meeting did discuss the program, but makes no recommendation to Presbytery at this time relative to it.

Equalization Fund

The Council in February approved the disbursements of the Equalization Fund in accordance with the needs of the various agencies of the Church sharing in it. Report of that distribution will come to you through the audits of Treasurer's books. The fund for this year is to be distributed early in July, after the receipts for June are all in hand, then again in October and again in January in accordance with the action of Presbytery last fall.

Last July Mr. A. L. Cavanaugh, Moderator of Presbytery, in his moderator's address, called to the attention of Presbytery some matters of importance. This address was referred to the Council for study and report. In February Mr. Cavanaugh was invited to be present for the meeting of the Council in order that he might give us further insight into the meaning of his suggestions. We regret that the action of the Council in inviting Mr. Cavanaugh to address Presbytery and present concrete proposals could not be accepted by him, since he has answered an invitation to be present at the meeting of the General Assembly of the First Born in heaven since that time. However, we present, for your information and consideration, some of the things which were suggested. In general, there were three areas in which it was felt we ought to be doing a better job.

I. The area of Presbytery Organization and Committee Work. Suggestions under this heading included:

a. Careful consideration by the Nominating Committee of persons nominated to fill vacancies on Presbytery committees. The Nominating Committee should contact persons to be nominated before their nomination to see whether or not they will serve on the committee, reminding such persons that they are only nominating, and the Presbytery may elect persons other than those nominated by the committee.

b. Formal notification by the Stated Clerk of persons elected to vacancies, and a letter from the chairman of the committee to the persons elected giving information relative to the work of the committee and welcoming the person so elected to membership on the committee.

c. At least one annual meeting of the committee for a full discussion of its work and program in the Presbytery, minutes of such meeting to be filed with the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery.

d. A larger representation of lay persons on all Presbytery committees.

II. Church Members.

a. A more thorough training in communicants classes of those coming into our church on profession of faith . . . not only in beliefs, but also in church policy.

b. A period of instruction for those received from other denominations particularly in Presbyterian procedure and doctrine.

c. Ministers giving more time to the training of lay persons for leadership in the church.

III. Planning.

An advisory council which would meet with churches anywhere in the Presbytery to help them in planning their organizations and church program.

Your council brings these suggestions to you without recommendation, but with the feeling that they may stimulate thought, and thus lead to action.

Stewardship

We are happy to report that our per capita giving to benevolences in 1954 were slightly more than for other years. We are 81st among the Presbyteries in 1953 but rose to 71st among the Presbyteries in 1954. Thus we move from the top Presbytery on the bottom 5 to the top on the bottom 15. However, we believe that this is still not a true position for our churches and people. The chairman of the Council attended the area meeting on Stewardship in Charlotte this year, representing the Stewardship Committee and Council.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That those sessions not yet acting on the FORWARD WITH CHRIST program, make a study of the materials available from the General Council in Atlanta, and if they see fit to enroll in this program, setting goals for the local church in relation to the total goals of the General Assembly.

2. That an EVERY CHURCH CANVASS be approved for this September under the direction of the Stewardship Committee. This canvass to be made by persons chosen by the Stewardship Committee and trained by them.

3. In connection with this, that every church have a joint meeting of the Elders and Deacons between September 11 and September 30 to which shall be invited the representatives of the Stewardship Committee, that they may present:

- a. The total program of the church.
- b. The total benevolent askings of the agencies of the church.
- c. The relationship between the local church and the total program.

4. That the Every Member Canvass be stressed this fall in every church of our Presbytery, and that the officers give consideration to the pre-budget canvass. (In connection with this recommendation a filmstrip, "GO FORTH IN HIS NAME," is being made available to churches wishing to use it in training the canvassers. Make reservations through the Executive Secretary of the Presbytery.)

5. That the Presbytery's Council be authorized to draw up and approve the budget for the presbytery, allocate this budget to the various churches in accordance with the approved formula used last year, and to forward quotas to local churches as soon as possible.

Mr. Perry Robinson, of the Pike Church was introduced to the Presbytery by the Rev. W. H. Goodman, Jr., with the recommendation from the Committee on Candidates that he be admitted to examination for the purpose of becoming a candidate for the ministry under the care of the Presbytery. Mr. Goodman reported that all papers required were in hand, and Mr. Robinson was admitted to examination.

Rev. M. C. MacQueen conducted the examination on experimental religion which was sustained. The Moderator proposed the questions to the candidate from the Book of Church Order (Pg. 108) these being answered in the affirmative the charge to the candidate was delivered by Rev. Fitzhugh Clark who also closed the proceedings with prayer. Mr. Robinson was enrolled as a candidate for the ministry.

The following candidates for licensure and ordination were introduced to the Presbytery: Alvis M. Daniel and Reid H. Erwin.

A letter of dismissal for Mr. Daniel from the Presbytery of Orange was read and Mr. Daniel was admitted to Examination. A letter from the Presbytery of West Hanover for Mr. Erwin was read and Mr. Erwin was admitted to examination.

Rev. W. H. Goodman reported that the written parts for the candidates had been examined by the Committee on Candidates and recommended that this part of the examination be sustained. The recommendation was adopted.

The examination in Experimental Religion was conducted by the Rev. M. C. MacQueen and was sustained.

The examination in Theology was conducted by Rev. P. H. Gwynn and was sustained.

The examination in Sacraments and Church Government was conducted by the Rev. M. J. McChesney and was sustained.

The examination in English Bible was conducted by the Rev. J. A. Marrow, Jr. and was sustained.

Diplomas from Union Theological Seminary were accepted in lieu of examinations on Church History and the original languages of the Scriptures.

The following standing committees were appointed by the Moderator:

Resolutions of Thanks: F. C. Hutcheson and S. L. Purvis.

Leave of Absence: J. S. Steele and J. E. Hearn.

Place of next meeting: J. S. Walkup and Bryan Bender.

Presbytery recessed for lunch.

Presbytery reconvened at 2:00 p.m. with the singing of the hymn, "O Jesus, I Have Promised" and prayer by the Rev. C. W. Worth. The report of the standing committee on resolutions was presented in the presence of the Women of the Church and was approved by a standing vote. The report is as follows:

"We recommend that the Presbytery express its thanks to the members of the Lake Waccamaw Church for their most cordial entertainment of Presbytery; the excellent handling of the parking and registration and their earnest effort to afford every comfort.

Especially would we express our "full" thanks to the women of the Church who so graciously prepared the abundance of food and waited upon our needs. Further, that the Pastor be commended for his kindness and asked to convey to the congregation our thanks for the day.

We further recommend that Presbytery express appreciation to those examined by Presbytery for their inspiring messages to us and for the spiritual food afforded our souls."

Rev. John S. Steele reported for the Committee on Special Causes. The report was adopted and is as follows:

The Committee on Assembly's Special Causes makes the following report:

I. Assembly's Training School. Founded on November 4, 1914.

a. Greater Need—One evidence of the good service which has been rendered is the Church's increasing demand for the product of the school. With Church's growing in size, with new congregations being organized, with more pastors and people seeking a strong program of Christian Education and nurture in the fundamentals of the faith, with expansion continuing in the world mission fields, the need for the products of this Assembly's school seems destined to increase for some time.

b. Increased enrollment—The class which entered the school at the beginning of the 1954-55 school year is the largest since the school began to grant degrees in 1933. Enrollment at end of December, 1954 was 133.

c. Enlarged program offered—During this year definite steps were taken to enlarge and make more effective the school's offerings in the fields of World Missions, Field Work, and Church Music. During the year an experiment has been undertaken in making the library located on the Campus of U. T. S. the joint library of the two institutions, since there might be duplication in two libraries. The present A. T. S. library will be used as a demonstration Church Library, a demonstration Church office and as a reading room.

d. School received last year special gifts amounting to \$28,865.

e. The School has been able to meet all its current obligations and ended the year without debt. The balance sheet shows an increase of \$56,999.44 in total assets.

II. Historical Foundation.

The year was a memorable one for the Historical Foundation in that it marked the removal of its collection from Assembly Inn to the new building erected for its exclusive use on Assembly Drive in Montreat.

One of the greatest advances has been made in the care of Manuscript records of church courts. These exceedingly valuable materials, which had been closely packed in safes and in a wall vault at Assembly Inn, are now arranged on shelves in a spacious vault which combines safety with accessibility in an unusually convenient manner.

Building is practically completed with the exception of lights for the Lobby and floor covering for the stairway. Elevator not installed. \$109,000 has been spent on the structure and new furnishings. Other additions are necessary in the equipment. Total cost of this will be approximately \$30,000. \$19,400 is now in sight.

Among the Year's acquisitions was a file of the exceedingly rare American Presbyterian, published in Nashville, Tenn., from 1835-1839.

It is recommended that all ministers of the Church be urged to locate and secure for the collections of the Foundation such suitable items as may be found within the bounds of his congregation.

III. Mountain Retreat Association.

The trustees and Directors of Mountain Retreat Association would express themselves in believing the largest opportunity for Montreat to

serve the spiritual life of the Presbyterian Church and build the Kingdom, is through its Conference Program. We consider the fullest development of this opportunity as the first obligation to serve the Church.

Montreat moves forward in a most encouraging fashion. One important development, Mississippi Road extension, has been paved through the generosity of one friend. It is hoped that the resurfacing of Assembly Drive can be completed by the summer. The huge task of giving Montreat adequate electric power and changing over to 7,200 volt service will be completed within the year. This means an expenditure of approximately \$100,000.

Needs;

1. Secure funds for capital needs.
2. Basement of approximately half of Collegiate Building be inclosed and arranged for use, pavillion to be constructed adjacent to Collegiate Club Building. This needed for Young People's work.
3. Board of Trustees and Board of Directors are asking the Board of Women's work to devote the gifts of their Birthday Offering of 1956 to build a building for adequate work for the Children and young people's work as desired by the Board of Christian Education.
4. Building to house the boys who work in Montreat during the summer.

Assets have increased more than a half million dollars from 1947 to 1955.

Montreat College and Montreat Preparatory School for Girls is a part of the program of the Montreat Association. Some of the largest and best contractors in the State of N. C. say that it would cost the General Assembly a minimum of \$50,000 and probably nearer to \$75,000 a year to close up these buildings for nine months.

One Recommendation from the Mountain Retreat Association's report to the Assembly that I want to call your attention to:

That the General Assembly commend Montreat, its conference program, its education program, its Trustees and its Officers, to prayer groups and to churches for their fervent prayers.

IV. American Bible Society.

The American Bible Society is the organization the Presbyterian Church has set apart for the single task of providing the Holy Scriptures for all mankind.

In 1954 our church was represented at the Advisory Council meeting by Dr. Felix B. Gear of Columbia Seminary. 60 new translations either have been completed or were in process in 1954. Total publications in 1955 will approximate 14,000,000 including 500,000 Bible and 750,000 Testaments.

October 30th, 1955 is recommended as the day for the observation of Reformation Day. The suggested theme for sermons and special interest is, "Protestantism and The Christian Home."

V. Stillman College.

The year 1954-55 is another year of definite progress.

Student body has grown over last year 34%. 95 men students, 55 of the student body are Presbyterians, over a third of the boarding students. Twenty-nine have declared the intention of either entering the ministry, mission work, educational work of the church, or the Y. M. C. A. Is now an accredited college.

Have 24 full-time and seven part-time faculty members.

Increased endowment.

In 1948 the endowment was \$100,000. On March 2, 1955 was \$403,520.10. They expect \$117,758.56 more for endowment from the campaign pledges, including the \$100,000 challenge fund designated for that purpose. Another addition to the endowment will be a bequest of property valued by the executor of the estate at \$50,000 to which the college will be given title in October. The endowment can therefore be expected to be \$547,111.99 by the end of 1955. The need of an endowment several times this amount cannot be overstressed.

The severest loss the college has sustained in decades was in the death of Rev. A. R. Batchelor which occurred on January 8th of this year.

Through March 2, 1955 Stillman College has received from the campaign for Stillman College the amount \$678,462.69.

VI. Inter-Church agencies of the General Assembly.

a. World Council of Churches.

The World Council of Churches held its second Assembly in Evanston, Ill. last summer. The official participants numbered 1298 and came from 179 churches in 54 countries. The total membership of the Council is 163 churches, two more were added from South Africa last summer.

The theme of the last Assembly was, "Christ, the Hope of the World." A rather remarkable message centering around this theme was issued from the Assembly to the Churches. The message closes with these significant words, 'We are not sufficient for these things, but Christ is sufficient. We do not know what is coming to us, but we do know Who is coming. It is He Who meets us every day and Who will meet us at the end—Jesus Christ, our Lord. Therefore we say unto you: Rejoice in Hope.'

b. National Council of Churches.

One or more of the principals from our church on the General Board have attended each of its meetings. More than one alternate has attended in the absence of the principals. In response to the request of the General Board, our denomination appointed two laymen on the General Board, thus giving us four representatives, each having one-half vote. One of these laymen has been most active in the deliberations of the General Board.

The National Council of Churches is said to represent 63% of Protestantism.

The Council ended the year 1954 with a balanced budget. Receipts were \$8,692,725. Balance at the end of the year, \$593,549.

Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, Stated Clerk of the Presbyterian Church U. S. A. is the new President of the Council for the next three years. Mr. R. A. Farnsworth of our church is one of the new vice-presidents for the next 3 years.

Dr. J. R. McCain is the new lay representative from our Church. Mr. W. Y. Preyer of Greensboro is his alternate.

Dr. B. R. Lacy and Mr. R. A. Farnsworth are nominated to succeed themselves as our members of the General Board.

Our Assembly was asked to give \$125,000 to the Council for the year 1956.

REPORT OF JUDICIAL COMMISSION TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

June 28, 1955

The Judicial Commission respectfully submits the following Report to Wilmington Presbytery.

Your Commission secured from the Session of the Burgaw Presbyterian Church all documents and papers pertinent to the Incorporation of that Church under the laws of the State of North Carolina. These were carefully studied and compared with the articles of the Book of Church Order dealing with the incorporation of Churches. It was the unanimous opinion of the Commission that certain sections of the Charter and By-Laws of the Burgaw Church Corporation were not in accord with the Standards of the Presbyterian Church in the United States. Changes were suggested to the Session, which, in the opinion of the Commission, would bring the Burgaw Charter and By-Laws into satisfactory accord.

Subsequently, the Session of the Burgaw Church completely revised and rewrote their Articles of Incorporation in the form of, "An Amended Charter and By-Laws." These were presented to the Commission, studied by it, and found to be in full accord with the Standards of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S., and unanimously approved by the Commission. This Amended Charter has now been adopted by the required majority of a duly called and constituted Congregational meeting of the Burgaw Presbyterian Church, and registered by the Department of State in Raleigh, North Carolina.

Your Commission therefore reports that it is fully satisfied with the present status of the Burgaw Church Corporation.

Your Commission wishes to express its thanks and appreciation to the Pastor and Session of the Burgaw Presbyterian Church for the courteous and cooperative spirit in which they met with and worked with the Commission in all its negotiations. Without this attitude the task of the Commission would have been extremely difficult, if not impossible.

Upon receipt of this Report by the Presbytery the Commission requests that it be dissolved.

Dr. E. D. Witherspoon presented the report of the Committee on Church Extension which was adopted as follows:

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Report to Wilmington Presbytery

October 18, 1955

In presenting the report of the Executive Committee of Church Extension, it is with gratitude to God that we call to your attention the way in which He has blessed this Committee's work, and the very excellent work which has been done by the various sub-committees.

Home Missions

The work of the Committee of Home Missions is presented in four parts. First, we would call attention to the strengthening of the work by division of fields and additional leadership. The First Church of Morehead City has been granted permission to call a pastor for his full time, and the pastor is on the field. Wildwood, formerly grouped with the Morehead Church, also desired a full time minister and he is on the field. Both the Chinquapin and Bethel Churches made similar requests, and each have their own pastor. It is with thanksgiving that we mention this prog-

ress in the work of the Kingdom, as well as the fact that each church in the Presbytery except Willard, Teachey and Chadbourn has a pastor.

Second, we note the bettering of equipment. The Morehead City Church has broken ground for the first unit of a new and adequate church plant. The Acme Church and educational buildings have been completed. The Trinity Manse has been finished, and ground has been broken for a Fellowship Hall and Educational Building. The Harmony Church has under construction new Sunday School rooms which will meet its growing needs. The Caswell Church has completed an excellent Fellowship Hall and Educational Building. The Myrtle Grove Church has begun the construction of additional classrooms to meet its needs. The Woodburn Church has been remodeled and an adequate educational building has been added. Repairs and improvements have been made to several of Presbytery's Manses following hurricane damage.

Third, to meet the cost of repairs and new buildings, your Committee has, upon occasion, made loans to some of our churches. Over \$6,000 was repaid on these loans last year.

Fourth, the future promises many good things, as your Committee faces the possible establishment of the Larger Parish plan in one area of our Presbytery, the relocation of one of our churches, the regrouping of others, and the making it possible for others of our churches to have full time pastors.

Evangelism

Cooperative efforts in the field of Evangelism has been seen in various areas of the Presbytery. The exchange of pulpits with ministers from Virginia was effected in about seventy-five per cent of our churches with good results.

A program of Visitation Evangelism led by the Rev. Albert Dimmock was recently held in the Wilmington area, resulting in 179 additions to the churches. Plans are in the making to carry out similar programs of Visitation Evangelism in other sections of the Presbytery.

Your attention is called to the score cards, prepared by the Chairman of the Sub-Committee on Evangelism. These cards are available to those who have not obtained them.

During the last church year 402 persons were received on Profession of Faith and 588 by letter or Re-Affirmation of Faith.

Negro Work

Your Committee on Negro Work merely calls attention to the tremendous challenge in this area, and our unfinished work in the Negro Work Campaign. Those churches which have not completed the payment of their pledges are earnestly requested to give this matter their prayerful consideration.

Rev. J. C. McCann presented the report of the Committee on Homes which was adopted as follows:

The following is the report of Presbytery's Committee on Homes:

I. Presbyterian Orphan's Home.

Presbyterian Orphan's Home, now in its seventh decade, gives evidence of the blessing of God upon this part of the church's work. The Board of Regents calls upon all of us to join them in giving thanks to Almighty God for His blessing upon the Home that has been a home for thousands of children during sixty-five years.

The past year can be called a good one. The boys and girls of the Home have given a good account of themselves, both in their work and in their play. The supervisors of every area of the Home's life all give a good report on the activities of the students. The principal of the school reports a fine spirit and the coaches say that, from the standpoint of sportsmanship, it is the best in their experience with the teams. The members of the staff manifest a spirit of unity and understanding. The period of reorganization has resulted in a good working plan for the institution which gives the Board of Regents reason to feel confident in the program of the Home. The people of the Synod of North Carolina have manifested their confidence through their gifts to the Home. The books have been closed in the black and the Home does not owe a dollar that it cannot pay.

The Board of Regents would call attention to the perennial false rumor that it has more money than it needs. One needs only to visit the entire campus, observe the buildings in their much-needed state of repair, observe the lack of furniture and equipment in the rooms of the children to discover that Barium is not wealthy and that it does still have great needs yet to be met. The Board of Regents is making every effort to meet the needs of the boys and girls in the cottages and to provide adequately for them in food, in health facilities, and in clothes and in training so that the Presbyterians of North Carolina can be proud of what is done. Child-caring is expensive. Comparison of the work of Barium Springs shows that the cost per child is just a little above average of the eleven institutions within the state.

It is called to your attention that new buildings are being erected and old ones are being repaired. The new buildings have been erected out of money designated specifically for these purposes and not a penny has come from the operating budget. It is a cause of thanksgiving to know that people through their interest in the Home and through their wills are making provisions for these needs.

There is much yet to be done in order that the boys and girls may have a reasonable and adequate home-life within the buildings in which they live. To this end the Board of Regents dedicates itself.

The new church at Barium Springs is the realization of a dream in progress for fifteen years. The money that has gone into its erection has come from memorial gifts. There is yet an indebtedness which will necessitate the continuing of the memorials.

It is called to our attention that a film has been prepared to tell the story of the Home. This 16 mm film entitled, "When The Bow Breaks," is now available for use in any church within the Synod of North Carolina. You are urged to give your people an opportunity to visit Barium through the medium of this film.

II. Presbyterian Home, Inc.

The Board of Trustees respectfully reports the following major activities of the Presbyterian Home during the past year:

During 1954 there were an average of 41 members in the Home with only 3 deaths and 1 withdrawal. Our capacity was reached in November with 60 persons enjoying the comforts of the Home.

The second unit of the Home was completed in July, 1954 and also certain necessary alterations in the first unit. New members of the Home started coming in on May 1 and came at the rate of 3 or 4 a week until capacity was reached.

The new building was erected at a total cost of \$324,587.89. The total cost of furnishings for the second unit was \$32,783.96. Practically all of

the furnishings were provided as memorial gifts in memory of or in honor of some loved one. The total cost of \$357,371.85 was accomplished with a remaining debt of only \$95,000. As of July 1, 1955, this has been reduced to \$88,500.

On September 26, the Board of Trustees held a luncheon meeting for guests and then entertained approximately 1,000 visitors at an Open House of the newly completed building. Dr. James A. Jones, pastor of Myers Park Church, was the principal speaker on the program at four o'clock.

The Board of Trustees met for four regular quarterly board meetings and one special session during the year 1954. The Executive Committee of the Board met five times for the transaction of business.

The Board of Trustees has appointed a special committee to study long range planning. This committee has been actively at work studying sketches for an apartment project, the executive director's residence, and future buildings to be placed on the property of the Presbyterian Home. As the need arises and as quickly as money is made available, plans will be made to construct additional facilities.

III. William Black Home

This season the William Black Home opened for guest on June 15. This season the Home is under the efficient management of Miss Sarah Lytch, Miss Rea Lindler, and Miss Hassie Johnson. Representatives of the Women-of-the-Synod of North Carolina occupied the entire entertaining capacity of the Home during the Women's Training School, June 29-July 6.

The Women of the Synod, who have contributed so much toward the comfort and efficiency of the William Black Home, have recently given a \$475.00 "Mixer," Mrs. Sarah Belk Gambrell has contributed one dozen beautiful blankets, and Mrs. Grace Pomeroy White has added \$500.00 to the "J. Harvey White Memorial," the income of which is for the free entertainment of Home Mission workers and needy retired Ministers.

William Black Home is giving Home Mission workers and all Presbyterians of the Synod of North Carolina accommodations equal to any at Montreat at a saving of several dollars per week for room and board, and offers free entertainment to nine Home Mission workers, each Season, for an entire week. Minor, yet needed improvements have been made during the last year, such as installation of fan in the kitchen, insulation of the walls of the Home, the planting of \$400.00 worth of beautiful shrubbery about the Home, etc. All obligations have been met in full and the Home is debt-free.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION

1. That Wilmington Presbytery and the local congregations cooperate fully in the plans of the General Assembly and the Synod of North Carolina to emphasize the entire program of Christian Higher Education in 1956.

2. That the following days and seasons be observed:

That December 25, 1955 be observed as Christian Student Sunday.

That February 19, 1956, be observed as the Day of Prayer for Students around the world.

That April, 1956 be observed as the month for emphasis on Christian Higher Education.

That Wilmington Presbytery highlight its spring meeting with an outstanding speaker on Christian Higher Education.

That April 15, 1956 be observed as National Christian College Sunday.

3. That individual ministers be urged to present to their people our Presbyterian schools of higher education; to point out to youth the advantages of our schools; and to encourage local congregations to help deserving young people who need financial assistance through locally administered scholarship funds, and to acquaint them with available scholarships at our Presbyterian Colleges, so that a larger number of Presbyterian students can attend Presbyterian colleges.

4. That Wilmington Presbytery enthusiastically reaffirm the action of Synod in merging Flora Macdonald College, Presbyterian Jr. College and Peace College and pledge our whole hearted support to the establishment of a Presbyterian Co-Educational four year Liberal Arts College in Eastern North Carolina.

5. That the local congregations be informed of the importance of our Campus Christian Life program for our students in non-Presbyterian schools, and that they be urged to recognize their responsibility for the oversight and financial support of this work.

6. That local churches make a special effort to use our student workers and student deputation teams in various programs throughout the coming year, with special emphasis on summer caravans.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF PRESBYTERY TO THE 192ND STATED SESSION OF THE PRESBYTERY OF WILMINGTON

In accordance with the instructions of Presbytery at the meeting in June at Lake Waccamaw, your council has met, adopted a budget, approved the formula for the distribution of the budget to the local churches, and sent the apportionments to these churches. We submit herewith for admission to the record of Presbytery these actions.

The Presbytery of Wilmington, in session at Lake Waccamaw, June 28, 1955, instructed Presbytery's Council to prepare a budget for the support of the benevolence causes of the church for the year 1956, and to allocate the total budget among the churches of the Presbytery.

In obedience to the instructions, the Council of the Presbytery met on July 25, 1955, and adopted a budget as follows: For Assembly's Causes \$91,736.44, For Synod's Causes \$53,426.64, For Presbytery's Causes \$61,916.92, a total of \$207,080.00.

These figures represent the askings of the General Council, Synod's Council and Presbytery's Council. They are based upon the *actual minimum needs of the causes* for their support.

In September the Stewardship committee of the Presbytery sponsored four area Stewardship Training Sessions to which were invited the ministers in the areas, and laymen who might be trained to visit the churches in an every Church Canvass. The total attendance at these four training sessions was 77. Of the total in attendance 43 agreed to visit local churches and present the benevolence program of the Presbyterian Church to joint meetings of the Elders and Deacons in local churches. In response to an invitation to participate in this Every Church Canvass 55 churches were visited by teams of two men and heard the presentation. One is the report of Synod's Council with its recommendations, and the other the report of an Ad Interim committee of Synod making a study of Supplemental Offerings. Each of these reports contain information and recommendations that should be matters of vital concern.

That the Stated Clerk be instructed to write to Mr. Frederick Willetts, Sr., of Wilmington, expressing Presbytery's appreciation of the tireless and efficient labors of himself and his committee, and the cooperation of congregations of other denominations, in the current effort to secure the location of the Presbyterian College in the Wilmington area.

The report of the committee of Women's work was presented by the Rev. H. J. Kaylor who introduced Mrs. E. N. Pittman, president of the Women of the Presbytery. Mrs. Pittman was granted the privilege of the floor to give the annual report.

The report was adopted and is as follows:

MRS. E. N. PITTMAN

As we look back over the year's work just completed, we are filled with a deep sense of gratitude to God for His continued blessings upon us and for His guiding hand which has been felt in so many ways and at so many times. The Women of the Church have been devoted and zealous and the work has prospered due to their efforts, their faith and their love.

The membership is 4,659, divided into seventy-five groups with 195 circles. Total gifts for the year reached \$47,477.00; \$29,925.00 was

given to benevolences and \$17,552.00 to local church work. This is an increase of \$7,825.00 over the preceding year. Each group observed the Birthday in May and \$2,089.14 was given to the objective, a Christian hospital in Japan.

The special financial project for the year was the raising of five thousand dollars for the Lucy Steele Memorial Fund. The final figures are not available. At the last report we had given \$3,000.00 in loving memory of this devoted Bible teacher.

One scholarship, which pays \$266.00 annually, was given to Flora Macdonald College.

Special emphasis has been placed on efforts to have our women informed about the total program of our church. Miss Ruth Hillhouse, Field Worker from the Women's Board in Atlanta, came to our Presbytery in January. She met with small selected groups and in conferences when groups came together, and was most helpful. Two from the Mission field itinerated in February; Mrs. Alvin Clapp from Africa, and the Reverend L. W. Peterson from Japan. Dr. Charles Gibboney, Secretary of Promotion, from the Board of Church Extension in Atlanta, was with us in October. No woman, after hearing his stirring and informative messages, can ever again say she does not understand the scope of Church Extension as it now exists in our Church's program.

The 67th Annual meeting of the Women of the Church of Wilmington Presbytery was held in the First Church of Wilmington on October 20th and 21st, 1955. An evening session was held on the night of the 20th at which Dr. Ben Lacy Rose, pastor of the hostess church, was the inspirational speaker.

The "Days of Prayer" were held during the first two weeks of March. As always, these proved to be the spiritual high lights. These days are special because they inform and meet the special needs of the individual women in the local organizations as no other meetings do. A total of 540 attended these six meetings and \$240.00 was given to the Lucy Steele Fund.

Thirteen women attended the Synodical Training School at Peace College. Twenty-three were at the Women's Conference at Montreat. Twenty-six fine Negro women went for training at the Christian Conference for Negro Women at Winston-Salem. The number of women who go to this conference increases each year, which is most encouraging.

We met our White Cross quotas with nearly every group participating. This is a service which has especial appeal to small groups.

Many evidences of spiritual growth are noted. More women are in Sunday School and studying the Bible. We have an increase in Prayer Groups and in those who will lead in prayer and conduct Bible studies. Many report organizing the "shut-ins" into prayer groups and all minister to them in many ways. Our family altars and tithers increase slowly each year.

For the evidences of growth and devotion we are deeply grateful. There is still much to be accomplished but we enter the coming year with confidence. It is our prayer that as we go Forward with Christ in Christian Family Life, our service may be more acceptable to Him, and that faith and love may bind us more closely to Him and to each other.

MINUTES OF THE COMMISSION TO INSTALL
REV. JAMES W. MCGINNIS

The Commission of Wilmington Presbytery appointed to install Rev. James W. McGinnis as pastor of the Trinity Presbyterian Church met in the Community Chapel of Havelock, N. C., Sunday, December 4, 1955. Members present were Rev. E. D. Witherspoon, Rev. Albert G. Harris, Jr., Rev. L. A. Taylor, Ruling Elder H. L. Joslyn. Rev. L. A. Taylor was elected Clerk. Mr. A. E. Gibson, Moderator of the Presbytery was present and invited to take part in the service of installation. Parts assigned by the Presbytery were read. The Commission was led in prayer and recessed to the sanctuary, where the service was held.

By the invitation of the Commission, Mr. A. E. Gibson acted as moderator. The sermon was preached by Dr. E. D. Witherspoon from the subject "I believe in God." The Constitutional Questions were propounded by Dr. L. A. Taylor. The questions were answered in the affirmative by both the Minister and the members of the congregation and Rev. J. W. McGinnis was declared the duly constituted pastor of the congregation.

A charge to the pastor was given by Rev. Albert G. Harris, Jr. A charge to the congregation was given by Ruling Elder H. L. Joslyn. Rev. J. W. McGinnis pronounced the benediction.

The Commission reconvened after the service, approved the minutes, was dismissed with prayer.

Rev. S. N. Thomas gave an oral report for the Commission on the Minister and His Work. The Whiteville First Church was permitted to amend the terms of the call to its Pastor and was commended for paying a larger salary.

The resignation of Rev. S. M. Houck from the Pastorate of the McClure Memorial Church was accepted by the Presbytery after the Elder had reported on the action of the congregation, also the Bethany Church request that the terms of the call be amended so that Mr. Houck could serve full time in that church was granted. The date for the effectiveness of the resignation and for the beginning of the full time service at Bethany was left to the Sessions of the two churches.

The Committee on Evangelism was authorized to prepare charts on Evangelism and send these to the churches, the cost to be paid from the Contingent Fund of the Presbytery.

The report of the sub committee on Christian Relations of the Committee on Church Extension made its report which was adopted as follows:

CHRISTIAN RELATIONS

"In Christian Relations we seek to relate all of life, and the lives of all people, to Jesus Christ and to one another according to God's will as revealed in Holy Scripture."

Since this is the statement of the work of this Committee as it operates in all levels of our Church, it is apparent that each member of the Presbyterian Church is involved and should be personally concerned with the work which this Committee does.

This Committee, on the Assembly level, makes a study each year of one or more of the personal and social problems facing us as Christians and as a Church. The report to the 1955 Assembly reflects the important nature of this study. In the midst of this time of tension and difference of opinion within our Church concerning important issues, the Christian Relations Committee made a study and report on "Unity In The Church—With Diversity." The report is most helpful and should be carefully and prayerfully read and studied by both ministry and laity of our Church. In a supplemental report, attention was called to other most important problems such as Race Relations, Alcoholism, Juvenile Delinquency, and Citizenship.

The results of these various studies are passed down to the local level in three ways. First, classes are held each year at Montreat in Christian Relations for chairmen of Synod, Presbytery, and local church committees. Second, the Committee prints a paper each month called "THE BRIDGE." This paper offers exchange of ideas and tells of the work being done in the field of Christian Relations. Third, the committee prints and makes available to all interested persons helpful pamphlets dealing with the subjects under consideration.

On our Presbytery level little is done in this field of work. There is apparently little, if any interest expressed in this work by the Presbytery as a body. This must be true in other Presbyteries as well and in many churches. For this reason the General Assembly in this next church year

has given Christian Relations a season of special emphasis. We are in that season of emphasis now as the month designated was January.

The one thing that all seem to know about Christian Relations, is that it was through this committee that the question of segregation was brought up before our church in 1954. Since the matter of segregation falls within the scope of the work of this committee we feel that we must speak on the subject. In 1954 and 1955 our Assembly acted upon this subject. In 1955 our Synod also acted upon the matter. For this reason the question is now before the Presbytery and we can no longer ignore it.

We would like to say, first of all, that it is a regrettable fact that part of the misunderstanding on this matter is due not to what our church has done but to the fact that much of the thought expressed stems from the reading of sensational newspaper reports and from talking to people outside our church instead of prayerful study of the reports themselves. Brethren, this thing should not so to be!

Your committee feels that two things are clear from the reports of the Assembly and Synod. First, it was evidently felt that the Bible has something to say about the matter of race relations which Christians need to study and pray about in the light of Christian teaching. Second, these reports have urged the Presbyteries and Sessions to make a study themselves in the light of the Biblical teachings. We believe that the time has come for the Presbytery of Wilmington to comply with these requests. As Presbyterians we cannot refuse to hear the voice of the courts of the Church because the subject is controversial. We must comply with them with the earnest prayer that the Holy Spirit will show His will to us.

As we face this matter we would call attention to this year's report, "Unity In The Church—With Diversity," and call for the practice of Christian love and prayer on the part of each individual.

In the light of this report and with prayer that God will be glorified in this work your committee on Christian Relations makes the following recommendations:

1. That the local churches be urged to appoint Sessional committees on Christian Relations and the name of the chairman be sent to the Chairman of Presbytery's committee in order that information of this work might reach the local level.

2. That each congregation be urged to emphasize the work of Christian Relations during the period of special emphasis set up by our General Assembly in January.

3. That pastors and Sessions be asked to make use of the material available through this committee by familiarizing themselves with it and by placing it in the hands of the members of the congregation.

4. That, since we cannot escape the consideration of segregation, Sessions be urged to make a study of the reports on this matter which have come from the Assembly and Synod, doing so in the light of Scriptural teaching.

5. That after making this study of the action of our Church on segregation that they be requested to inform the congregation of these reports in a manner deemed wise by them, calling for prayer and Bible study.

6. That the Presbytery of Wilmington appoint seven additional men, four elders and three ministers, to serve with the members of this committee as a special committee to study the report of the Synod of North Carolina in the light of Scripture, with the aim of possibly adopting this report as the statement of this Presbytery on the matter of Racial Relations.

The report of the Executive Committee on Christian Education was presented by Rev. Samuel M. Houck, Chairman, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

April 1956

Your committee has reviewed the reports of the Sessions of our churches to Presbytery with thanksgiving to God for his blessing upon the educational program of our churches. Statistics tell only a small part of the story of the development of leadership, of the outreach to new persons, of the blessings of God in greater understanding that has come to

our people. The most pertinent data will be found in the annual statistical report to the General Assembly which you will receive in the printed minutes of Presbytery.

A major concern of your committee for the past year has been the task assigned to us by the Presbytery last April . . . that is, the investigation of the necessity for, and location of, a camp site for the Presbytery. The committee in carrying out this responsibility was represented at a conference on camp site procurement and development in January, in Birmingham, Alabama. We have met several times, and investigated many sites.

We would remind the Presbytery that this is no small undertaking. In order to determine something of the necessity for such a camp site, your committee spent several hours considering the program which would probably be sponsored, whether or not the present camping program and conference program were enough, and what new ventures ought to be pursued. In the light of what we feel to be a present and growing need we think the time has come for the Presbytery to purchase a site for the development of a camp.

Having come thus far, your committee began looking at various sites in the Presbytery, not with a view to the cheapest, nor the one that would prove most readily available, but one that would meet certain standards: for example, we wanted a site that would be accessible, yet not too accessible; a site that had a variety of landscape; a site with water for swimming, etc.; a site that could be developed for use by small groups for day camping while being used by week campers; a site that would appeal to adults as well as young people; a site that could be controlled; a site near enough to doctors and hospital facilities to be safe . . .

In the light of what we considered the requirements of a camp site, your committee in small groups and as a whole, walked over a great many acres of land, drove our cars a good many miles, spent a great deal of time. We feel that our efforts have not been wasted. We make the following recommendations:

1. That the Presbytery approve the securing of two tracts of land in Pender County for development of a camp site. These lands total 150 acres, more or less and will cost a total of \$6,760.00.

2. That the Presbytery approve the committee making down payment on these lands.

3. That the Presbytery elect a Camp Development Committee to be composed of twenty-one (21) persons: The Chairman of the Committee of Church Extension, The Chairman of the Committee on Higher Education, The Chairman of the Committee of Christian Education, The Chairman of the Committee of Christian Education of the Women of the Church of the Presbytery, the Executive Secretary of the Presbytery, one man elected by the Council of the Men of the Presbytery, and fifteen (15) persons at large in the Presbytery.

a. This committee should have authority to:

(1) Plan for the program of the camp site

(2) Secure competent architectural service of a camp architect

(3) Plan and promote a financial campaign in the Presbytery for the development of the property

(4) Plan for the orderly development of the camp site in accordance with a Master Plan worked out with the architect

4. That all churches share in the Forward With Christ program this year with the emphasis upon the Christian Home being foremost.

The report of the Executive Committee on Higher Education was presented by Rev. W. H. Allison, Chairman of the committee.

Pending adoption of the report Presbytery heard an address by Dr. Hunter B. Blakely of the Board of Christian Education, on "The Importance of the Christian College."

The report of the committee was adopted and is as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON HIGHER
EDUCATION

Wilmington Presbytery — April 17

The General Assembly of 1954, aroused by the situation confronting Christian higher education, designated the year 1956 as a year of Special Emphasis for the Entire Program of Christian Higher Education. The needs of the Church necessitated this action. A free Church depends, for its survival and the propagation of its faith, upon a well trained ministry and an educated constituency. The institutions of the Church needed this action. All of our schools were fighting a losing battle with inflation and the indifference of the Church at large to the expanding needs of higher education. The generation in which we live needed it. A free society depends upon the education of its leadership. Since 1947 the proportion of students in tax-supported schools has risen sharply over that of those in church-related and independent schools. Then, too, we have to take into consideration the church's responsibility for the steadily increasing number of college students that promises an enrollment double that of the present fifteen years from now.

The Synod of North Carolina is very much aware of this added emphasis on Christian higher education, because of the action taken at its meeting last summer that has resulted in positive action looking toward the merger of Flora Macdonald College, Peace College, and Presbyterian Junior College, and the establishment of a senior, coeducational, liberal arts college at Laurinburg, N. C. A financial campaign to raise \$3,500,000 to establish the consolidated college and to provide additional funds for the program of Campus Christian Life has been launched. Inspired by the contribution that Presbyterianism has made to higher education in the past, we believe Presbyterian Higher Education has an equally important contribution to make now. Aware of the magnitude of this undertaking and the formidable obstacles that must be overcome for a successful campaign, we believe that the urgency of the need of Presbyterian higher education is far greater than any other consideration, and that we should let nothing stand in the way of the completion of this financial campaign.

Attention is called to the part that Campus Christian Life shares in our emphasis on the whole program of Christian higher education and in the financial campaign for \$500,000 for augmenting the program of Campus Christian Life in the Synod of North Carolina. Our responsibility for the spiritual care of Presbyterian students in tax-supported schools is just as great as for those in our Presbyterian Colleges. The task is far too great for the local churches, though they have done a praise-worthy work. Adequate facilities and full time student workers are needed at Duke, East Carolina, North Carolina, State College, and Woman's College.

We are glad to report that we now have eleven candidates for the ministry under care of Presbytery. Six of these are students at Union Theo-

logical Seminary in Richmond, Va., and five are in college. We have one candidate for lay service attending the Assembly's Training School in Richmond.

Recommendations

1. That Wilmington Presbytery urge every local church to participate fully in the program of emphasis on Christian Higher Education projected by the General Assembly for this year.

2. That the Presbytery also go on record as giving its undivided support to Synod's financial campaign for the consolidated college and campus Christian Life. That our people be encouraged to give liberally and prayerfully to this cause.

3. That every Church strive to have a good representation at the Presbytery Rally at the Wallace Church Sunday, April 22nd at 3:30 p.m.

4. That Dr. Hunter B. Blakley, Secretary of the Division of Higher Education of the Board of Christian Education, be heard in connection with this report.

5. That a representative of the firm Ward, Dreshman, and Reinhardt be heard also.

A season of Prayer was observed, and prayer was led by Rev. T. B. Ruff for the cause of Christian Higher Education.

Rev. J. R. Phipps presented the report of the committee on Annuities and Relief.

The report was adopted and is as follows:

I am pleased to report that 1955 was an excellent year for the Board of Annuities and Relief.

1. *Ministers' Annuity Fund.*

The membership in the Ministers' Annuity Fund as of December 31, 1955 was 2,719. This is an increase of 134 over December 31, 1954.

Assets of the Fund as of Dec. 31, 1954.....\$16,513,111.32

Assets of the Fund as of Dec. 31, 1955.....18,224,362.81

An increase of.....1,711,251.49

The amount paid out in annuities from—April 1, 1940

(beginning of the Fund) to December 31, 1955.....2,522,180.26

In 1955 the Board supplemented from the funds of Ministerial Relief the annuities of 321 annuitants to the extent of \$287,912.34. The total supplements paid since 1946—\$1,316,582.03.

2. *Employees' Annuity Fund.*

This fund began to function September 1, 1942 and as of December 31, 1955 we had 539 members enrolled. This is an increase of 46 over December 31, 1954. Since the beginning of this Fund, 7 employees have retired because of age and 3 because of total and permanent disability.

3. *Relief.*

This is one of the Board's greatest opportunities for service. Most of this Fund is created by the Joy Gift. The Board sent to 316 homes in 1955—\$200,253.06 . . . this was divided among 56 ministers, 231 widows, 14 homes of 15 orphans and 15 non-ministerial workers. These beneficiaries

were never participants in the Ministers' Annuity Fund. The oldest beneficiary celebrated her ninety-ninth birthday, January 11, 1956. The total number of homes assisted from Relief Funds—were 637 for \$488,165.40.

The Churches' generosity to relief has made it possible for us to continue assistance to the many beneficiaries on our relief rolls.

4. Insurance.

The Board of Annuities and Relief now has enrolled in the life insurance plan 2,293; in the hospitalization 1,678; dependents 529. Fine progress has been made but we should not be satisfied until *all* of our eligible employees and ministers are enrolled in this plan. Officers and laymen of the churches must take the initiative in this program. The ministers cannot push this too vigorously because they are directly affected. *Every* church should be in this plan and *all eligible employees covered*. The group life insurance plan was started July 1, 1952 and the group hospitalization plan started October 17, 1953. Since the beginning of these plans the Board has paid 46 life insurance death claims totaling \$110,000.00; 940 hospital and surgical claims totaling \$89,142.12.

5. Presbyterian Center.

The Board owns the Presbyterian Center in Atlanta, Georgia. All the agencies of the Church with the exception of the Board of World Missions, Nashville, Tennessee, the Board of Christian Education, Richmond, Virginia, and Presbyterian Foundation, Charlotte, North Carolina, are housed in this Center. Our Church has a total investment of \$81,629.92 in this property, the balance of the money needed to purchase it was put up by Presbyterian laymen of Atlanta, Georgia. Presbyterian Center is a fine asset to the Church that has resulted in economy and efficiency for the agencies domiciled there.

Wilmington Presbytery has four annuitants receiving a total of \$3,-475.00. This is an increase over last year of \$500.00.

Our Presbytery has two ministers on Ministerial Relief. They received from the Board of Annuities and Relief a total of \$1,800.00.

Grants were also made from the Reynolds Fund.

The Relief Grants to our beneficiaries are now the highest they have been in the history of the Board. The Board does not feel however, that they are adequate, but it is the best they can do at this time. The only source of the Relief Fund is from the Joy Gift and the Benevolent Budget of the Church. This is a cause worthy of our attention, effort and prayer.

January 20 and 22, 1956

The Commission on the Minister and His Work of Wilmington Presbytery met in the Acme Church on Thursday, January 20, 1956. Members present: Thomas, Kirby, Worth; ex-officio member Taylor. Present by invitation of the Commission Rev. J. Clyde Plexico. The Chairman, Rev. Samuel N. Thomas, Presided. The meeting was opened with prayer.

The Chairman read a communication signed by all the Ruling Elders of the Woodburn Church, requesting the resignation of their pastor, Rev. J. Clyde Plexico.

Mr. Plexico expressed surprise over the request and stated that in his judgment he and the Elders were harmonious. When told of some of the criticisms made of him by the Elders, Mr. Plexico had explanations of extenuating circumstances for each criticism. Approximately two hours were spent in discussing the Woodburn Church and the present dissatisfaction.

The Commission adjourned to meet with the Ruling Elders of the Woodburn Church on Saturday, January 22, 1956. The meeting adjourned with prayer.

The Commission met at the Woodburn Church on January 22, 1956 at 8:00 p.m. Present were Thomas, Worth, Kirby, ex-Officio member Taylor. Present by invitation were the Ruling Elders of the Woodburn Church. All elders were present. The meeting was opened with Prayer. More than an hour was spent hearing the different elders express the points of dissatisfaction with their pastor, Rev. J. Clyde Plexico. The Elders were unanimous in the conviction that the best interest of the Woodburn

Church would be served if Mr. Plexico were to resign at once. After some discussion the Elders agreed:

Carolina Beach, William McDonald; Myrtle Grove, Frank LeRay. A quorum was found present.

The Presbytery was constituted with prayer by Rev. J. W. Ware.

Rev. J. W. Ware made a request of Presbytery that the pastoral relations between the churches of Carolina Beach and Myrtle Grove and himself be dissolved and that he be granted a letter of dismissal to the Presbytery of El Paso, Synod of Texas. Ruling Elder Frank LeRay stated that the Myrtle Grove Church joined Mr. Ware in this request with sincere reluctance. Ruling Elder William McDonald stated that the Carolina Beach Church likewise joined Mr. Ware in the request with reluctance. On motion by E. D. Witherspoon, seconded by T. B. Ruff, the Presbytery voted to grant the request and ordered the Stated Clerk to issue the letter of Dismissal. Members of the Presbytery spoke in appreciation of Mr. Ware and his work in terms of warm praise and commendation.

W. H. Goodman, Chairman of the sub-committee on Candidates, presented Mr. William McDonald, a member of the Carolina Beach church, and moved that he be admitted to examination as an applicant to be received under the care of Presbytery as a Candidate for the Ministry. Rev. J. F. Clark conducted the examination on Experimental Religion and Motives for Seeking the Ministry. The examination was sustained and Mr. McDonald was received under the care of the Presbytery. The Moderator propounded the Constitutional Questions to the Candidate, delivered a charge and offered a prayer in his behalf.

Rev. C. W. Worth, Chairman of the sub-committee on Home Missions, made a brief report for the sub-committee and offered the following recommendations to the Presbytery:

1. That the Presbytery authorize the Home Mission Committee to sell the Cape Fear Church property to the best advantage of the Cape Fear Church and at a price not less than \$15,000.00.
2. That the proceeds of this sale be turned over to the Building Fund of the Cape Fear Church.
3. That the Trustees of the Presbytery be authorized and directed to negotiate the proper instruments for the transfer of title to this property.

On motion by C. W. Worth, seconded by J. W. Ware, Presbytery adopted the recommendation.

The attention of the Presbytery was called to the action taken recently by the Board of Trustees of the Proposed Consolidated

Presbyterian College, by which the Trustees included Wilmington among the five cities to be considered as the place in which the College will be located. A Resolution was offered by M. G. Stimpson. The recommendation was adopted and is as follows:

RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE PROPOSED CONSOLIDATED PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE

1. That the Presbytery of Wilmington, in adjourned session on February 7, 1956, unanimously and heartily approves the City of Wilmington as being the wisest possible choice of locations for the Proposed Consolidated Presbyterian College and,

2. That the Presbytery goes on record agreeing to support the College to the fullest extent both now and in the future years.

Presbytery, by unanimous vote authorized the Moderator to appoint a Committee to speak for the Presbytery before the Board of Trustees of the Proposed College when the Board meets in Wilmington to further study this location. The Moderator appointed Rev. William Hood, and Rev. Charles W. Worth to speak for the Presbytery.

The Minutes of the meeting were read and adopted. Presbytery adjourned with prayer by Rev. T. B. Ruff.

Bordeaux spoke for the congregation and stated that the congregation concurred in the request. The request was granted and the Stated Clerk was authorized to grant a letter of dismissal for Mr. Plexico.

Rev. B. L. Rose, Chairman, gave the report of the Committee on Nominations, nominating R. V. Wells a Trustee of Presbytery. The nomination was seconded and passed. Mr. Rose then gave the report of the Nominating Committee nominating Dr. B. F. Hall to succeed Rev. Jack W. Ware, and Rev. C. L. Kirby to succeed W. T. McLean, as Trustees of Flora Macdonald College. The nominations were seconded and passed.

Rev. C. W. Worth, Chairman, presented the request from the Committee on Home Missions for permission to borrow funds from the Adam Latta Trust for the purpose of financing one or two manses. The request was granted providing that there will be an early consultation with the officers of the church to the end that the officers of the church shall understand that as the church is able it will repay the loan, with the first payment due in not less than five years.

The Trustees of Presbytery were authorized to provide the necessary legal papers for the securing of the loan, giving a first-mortgage on the property as security.

The Presbytery adjourned with prayer by Rev. Wade H. Allison, after the Minutes had been read and approved.

STATED SESSION

The 195th Stated Session of the Presbytery of Wilmington convened at the Wallace Presbyterian Church, Wallace, N. C., Tuesday, July 24, 1956 at 10:00 A.M. The opening worship was conducted by the Moderator, Ruling Elder E. L. Derrick, who also preached the sermon using as his text: Acts 28:14.

The following communications were read:

From Dr. Ben L. Rose requesting that the pastoral relations between himself and the First Presbyterian Church of Wilmington be dissolved and that he be granted permission to labor outside the bounds of the Presbytery as a professor in the Union Theological Seminary . . . after the Church was heard from through the ruling elder present, indicating that it concurred in this request, the Presbytery dissolved the Pastoral relationship and granted Dr. Rose permission to labor outside the bounds of the Presbytery. From Rev. N. H. Flowers regarding a leadership training school to be held in Rose Hill, November 5-9 . . . referred to the Committee on Christian Education.

Certificates of dismissal for candidates to be received by Presbytery were referred to the Committee on Examinations.

Rev. W. B. Hood, Pastor of the host church, welcomed Presbytery and made necessary announcements.

The Presbytery adopted a docket prepared by the Stated Clerk.

The Moderator announced the following standing committees:

Leave of Absence: Rev. A. G. Harris, Jr., Chairman. Ruling Elders Frank Blanchard and Troy King.

Place of Next Meeting: Rev. C. L. Kirby, Ruling Elders Clark Allen and J. F. Carr.

Resolutions of Thanks: Rev. Alvis Daniel, Hardin Kimrey and R. W. Davis.

The Committee on Higher Education was excused that it might meet.

Rev. J. S. Steele reported for the Committee on Special Causes and the report was received as information.

Rev. Samuel M. Houck reported as Chairman of the Council of Presbytery. The report with its recommendations was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

JULY, 1956

The Council of the Presbytery has met twice during the past year. We have sought to carry out the responsibilities laid upon us by the Manual of Presbytery to the best of our ability.

In reviewing the records of the past year we are glad that God has blessed the work of our Presbytery in all phases of its activities. In church buildings, in worship services, in educational programs our churches have moved forward. Our record last year in evangelism was also a cause of rejoicing. We are grateful to God for these evidences of His favor upon our work.

But we are not complacent, for we realize that there are yet unclaimed areas of the life of the Presbyterians in this Presbytery; areas which could make great contribution to the cause of Christ if thoroughly committed. In view of the fact that this is the year of emphasis in the "Forward With Christ" program, we especially call to your attention our failures in the stewardship of possessions.

One way of discovering our status in this matter is by comparison with other Presbyterians in our General Assembly. In our per capita giving we ranked 74th among the 85 Presbyteries in 1955. The average per capita

giving in the General Assembly was a bit over \$100.00 per person, in our Presbytery the average was slightly above \$62.00 per person. In the Synod of N. C., the average giving per capita was \$77.00 per person, in our Presbytery \$15.00 less than the average for the Synod as a whole.

As one means of combatting this lack on our part, we held last year an Every Church Canvass in our Presbytery. Teams of men, specially trained for the task visited in over 75% of our churches, presenting the benevolent program of the church. It is hoped that some good effects of this Every Church Canvass will be reflected in the giving to the church this year. The Council hopes to continue that program this fall.

As another means of doing something about this evident failure to give as God has prospered us, your Council would call to your attention two fallacies which we feel may be prevalent in our Presbytery.

One of these is the mistaken idea that the benevolence budgets of the General Assembly, the Synod and the Presbytery are just some figures that are snatched from the air, and have no real relation either to the needs of the program nor to the ongoing of the Kingdom of Christ. We would assure you that this idea is not true. These budgets are minimum askings for the agencies of our church on the level of the General Assembly, the Synod and the Presbytery. They are "hold the line" budgets, not "Forward With Christ" budgets.

The Council of the General Assembly, of the Synod and of the Presbytery carefully consider each item in these budgets of the respective church courts. The Council of the General Assembly approved budgets for Assembly's Agencies which totalled \$700,000.00 less than was asked for the agencies. The Council of Synod approved a budget that was \$45,000.00 less than asked for. These budgets are not padded. They are rock bottom budgets if the program of the church is to be carried on as Presbyterians would want it to be.

A second fallacy, which we fear is widespread, is that the Kingdom enterprise can be financed by pressure or project giving. Pressure giving is that in which the person who gives does so because he can't afford not to give something. He gives just enough to remain respectable. We believe also that project giving is less than Christian Stewardship. Project giving is that which comes through an appeal for some special project . . . e.g., a building program, support of some cause worthy in itself, but without relation to a total program of the church, etc. While we would not desire to cut off support for any worthy cause, we affirm our belief that project giving is not the highest form of Christian Stewardship.

We would also affirm our confidence that the Kingdom of God can be adequately and fully financed through stewardship which is based upon principles, principles which are theologically based and oriented. Ministers, Ruling Elders, Boards of Deacons need to be constantly reminded, and need to be constantly reminding the people of their congregations that giving is based upon the principle of redemption. We were sinners, without hope save in the sovereign mercy of God. As sinners, God saw us rescued from the power and penalty of our sin, saved us by his grace to a life of usefulness in His kingdom. What is that redemption worth? Here is the first principle of being a Christian Steward . . . He loved me and gave Himself for me.

Again there is the principle which is set forth in the doctrine of creation. The earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof, the sea and they that dwell therein. The silver and the gold, the cattle upon a thousand hills, these too are the Lord's. He owns, we only tenant for a little while that which is God's. And this too: We are his. Not only the earth, but we ourselves are the creatures of His hand. "In Him we live and move and

have our being." He is the fountain out of which we have sprung. Our stewardship rests upon the abiding principle that we are the Lord's . . . whether in obedience and glad fellowship or in disobedience and rebellion. We are God's.

Again we may consider our stewardship upon the basis of our loyalty to the cause of Christ whose we are and whom we serve. In His life and death and rising again, Jesus Christ brought life and immortality to light through the Gospel. Those who have never heard the Word of Life as it is proclaimed in Christ die in sin. He gave commission to His church to tell the story until all should believe. We are that church. That commission is our commission. The church, for which Christ gave his life, languishes and shamefully faces a world of great opportunity with its resources at a low ebb . . . waiting for us to give as God has given to us.

Because of the redemption which we have, the forgiveness of our sins through Christ, because of the Doctrine of Creation which relates all of life to God and because of the loyalty which we have toward the cause of Christ, we must put our stewardship on the basis of our faith, not on the basis of our feelings.

Further, we would remind the members of our churches, one and all of the guide for giving which is given to us in the Scriptures. Two guides are laid down for us in the Covenant of God with his people. One is the principle of one day in seven for worship and the recreation of our life. The other is the tenth of our increase in material things for the support of the Kingdom. In the Old Testament it is as if God were saying to the people of Israel: "I have chosen you and it is my intention to make you a great nation, rich and prosperous. In return for these blessings my requirements are that you keep my sabbath and that you tithe." Israel did neither and Israel suffered.

In the New Testament we are face to face with the grace and truth that came through Jesus Christ. Now the law is fulfilled, and we see the matchless favor of God which promises us all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ Jesus. Now our standard of giving is not the legalism of the Old Testament tithe, but the standard of the love of God in Christ. But this grace of God is not received in all its glory until in our response to it we accept responsibility, until we report for duty saying, "Here am I, Lord, What wilt thou have me to do?" Surely in this day of opportunity, with a battle cry of "Forward With Christ" in our church, we ought to reaffirm our loyalty to the guides God has given us. And we ought to fulfill our stewardship on the basis of the principles which are a vital part of our Christian faith.

We do not practice Christian stewardship and we are poverty stricken. Let us here and now covenant with our Redeemer and Lord that we shall seek to be good stewards of all His mercies to the end that His Kingdom shall come sooner and His will be done among men.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That Presbytery accept the apportionment for General Assembly benevolences in the amount of \$90,082.00.
2. That Presbytery accept the apportionment for Synod's Benevolences in the amount of \$60,722.00.
3. That Presbytery adopt a budget for Presbytery benevolences in the amount of \$63,077.00. This is to be broken down as follows:

Church Extension	\$44,827.00
Christian Education	750.00
Camp Committee	3,000.00
Presbytery Office	14,500.00

4. That the Stewardship Committee of Presbytery be authorized to work out the percentages to be assigned to each item in the budget when these percentages are received from Synod's office.
5. That this budget be apportioned to the churches using the formula of $\frac{1}{3}$ on the basis of membership, $\frac{1}{3}$ on the basis of average benevolent giving over the past three years and $\frac{1}{3}$ on the basis of total average giving over the past three years excluding building expenses.
6. That it be specifically remembered by Sessions and Boards of Deacons that this is a minimum budget.
7. That an Every Member canvass be held in each church this fall and that Presbytery commend to all churches the effectiveness of the Pre-Budget canvass in presenting the program of the church to the membership.
8. That the film slide, "This Is Your Church" be commended to churches for use in preparing the congregations for the Every Member Canvass. This slide may be booked for use through the office of Presbytery.
9. That the Presbytery again affirm its participation in the "Forward With Christ" program, and that all sessions be urged to study their own church program with a view to going "Forward With Christ in Stewardship" in 1957.
10. That Presbytery adopt a minimum income of \$4,000.00 for each minister in the Presbytery, as recommended by the Synod of N. C.
11. That the Committee on Annuities and Relief in the Presbytery be urged to promote the Hospital plan of the General Assembly's Board of Annuities and Relief within the bounds of our Presbytery.
12. That Presbytery approve an appropriation of \$800.00 from the Contingent Fund of Presbytery to the Camp Committee for the beginning of development of the Camp and Conference Centre.
13. That Presbytery approve an Every Church Canvass this fall under guidance of the Stewardship Committee of the Council and that the cost of this canvass be paid from Presbytery's Contingent Fund.
14. That Presbytery approve a request from the Committee on World Missions for funds to defray expenses from the Contingent Fund of a speaker for the January meeting of Presbytery, and that the committee be requested to suggest to the retiring Moderator that this guest speaker preach the opening sermon at the January meeting of the Presbytery.
15. That the salary of the Executive Secretary of the Presbytery be raised as of January 1, 1957 to \$6,000.00.
16. That this report be sent to every pastor and Clerk of Session of vacant churches with the request that it be studied by all Sessions and Boards of Deacons before the Every Member Canvass.

Rev. M. G. Stimpson presented the report for the Committee on Christian Relations which was adopted as follows:

THE SUB-COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN RELATIONS OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE SUBMITS THE FOLLOWING REPORT TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

The attention of Wilmington Presbytery is called to the fact that 1957 is the year of emphasis on CHRISTIAN CITIZENSHIP throughout the General Assembly; and that the month of *January* is designated as the time of special study of CHRISTIAN RELATIONS and the month of *July* for the study of CHRISTIAN CITIZENSHIP.

The following recommendations adopted by the General Assembly in June are hereby presented to Wilmington Presbytery for adoption:

1. That Overture 46 from Lexington Presbytery to the 1955 General Assembly, reading as follows: "That the General Assembly go on record as opposing: (a) beer and liquor advertising on radio and television, and in newspapers and magazines; (b) the type of program presented on radio and television which exalts the criminal as hero; and (c) the publishing and distribution of horror-sex-crime stories and pictures in so-called comic books," be answered as follows: A. That the General Assembly go on record as deploring (a) the wide advertising of beer and liquor through the channel of radio and television, newspapers and magazines; (b) the publishing and distributing of horror-sex-crime stories in format. B. That church members be urged to use their influence in the local community to arouse sentiment against such advertisements and publications, both through group and individual channels, and to protest to the agencies which promote such practices.

2. That the report of the Council on Christian Relations to the General Assembly, entitled, "The Church's Relationship to Community Delinquency Problems," . . . be commended for study . . . among the churches.

3. That all churches in the General Assembly make use of the month of January for informing members of the scope of Christian Relations and emphasizing the relevance of Christian attitudes and actions to Christian profession and living.

4. That in their planning for 1957 the session of each church make provision for observing through study programs and plans affecting community life the special emphasis of "Christian Citizenship."

5. Church leaders, both ministers and laymen, and church members generally are called upon to accept their responsibility as Christian citizens in promoting justice and good will, and in sustaining law and order in their local communities during these days of tension and transition in the South.

6. That as a necessary means of promoting right human relations and the democratic way of life, the use of the conference table is suggested, where citizens, regardless of race, may confront their common problems with full and equal opportunity of expression in seeking a solution to them.

7. That prayer be made for the guidance and blessing of God upon our nation in these days of crisis and decision; and upon the church that a true witness to the redemptive power of God, both in individual and corporate life, may be given.

8. That the session of each church be urged to appoint a committee or use an existing committee to interpret, encourage, and support the work of Christian Relations; and that the name of the chairman of this committee be sent to Presbytery's chairman, the Rev. M. G. Stimpson, Burgaw, N. C. (if this has not already been done).

Dr. Ben L. Rose presented to Presbytery the work of a committee to revise the manual. The revised manual was adopted as amended.

The Revised Manual was approved to go into effect at the October meeting of the Presbytery, and the Stated Clerk was authorized to have copies printed in pamphlet form for general distribution, cost to be paid from the Contingent Fund of Presbytery.

Presbytery recessed for lunch at the American Legion hut after prayer by Dr. L. A. Taylor.

Presbytery reconvened at 2:00 P.M. with the singing of the hymn, "What A Friend We Have In Jesus" and prayer by the Rev. Jerry C. McCann.

Rev. M. G. Stimpson reported for the Committee on Camp and Conference Grounds. The report was adopted and is as follows:

REPORT TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY BY THE COMMITTEE ON CAMP AND CONFERENCE GROUNDS

Your committee looks forward to the development of an adequate camp site to be used in Presbytery's program of Christian Education; and dedicates itself to securing adequate facilities for a camping program that will provide opportunity for commitment to God's will through Jesus Christ, for a sense of relationship to God and to persons, and for personal development in an experience of Christian living, for all ages and groups that shall be using these facilities.

Your committee is happy to report that 155 acres of land have been secured for Presbytery's Camp Site. This site is located ½ mile west on the Watha road, 6 miles north of Burgaw, and 8 miles south of Wallace, off Route #117.

The 27 acre tract has been paid for in full. Thirty per cent of the 128 acre tract has been paid, and the Trustees of Presbytery have signed two notes in the amount of \$1,596.00 each, at 4% interest; one of which will be due the first of May 1957 and the second in May of 1958.

A topographical survey of the entire area is being made at the present time and should be completed in the near future. This survey is being made under the supervision of Mr. John B. Davis, Jr., Surveyor, and professor in the Wilmington Junior College, whom we have asked to explain in graphic form to the members of Presbytery the description of the land and the purpose of the survey.

Your committee has set up the following schedule of development with the hope that the camp site will be ready for use during the summer of 1958:

- Completion of the Topographical Survey,
- Building of an entrance road,
- Securing the assistance of a camp architect,
- Digging of a well to furnish an adequate water supply,
- Work camps to clear building sites and clean away fallen trees and brush,
- Build kitchen and dining hall and units for campers. (Opportunity will be given gladly to those churches desiring to build cabins).

Toward this end a Financial Campaign is planned for the fall of 1957. Request has been made to Presbytery's Council that \$3,000.00 be placed in the Benevolence budget of Presbytery for 1957. However, prior to the receipt of funds from either of these sources, certain monies will be necessary:

- Approximately \$200.00 to complete topographical survey,
- Payment of the first note, \$1,596.00 plus interest, by May 1957,
- Approximately \$300.00 for the aid of a camp architect,
- All additional funds will be to a definite advantage.

In order that we may have these necessary funds by May 1, 1957 it is hoped that our treasury will receive gifts from interested individuals, Sunday Schools, Men's Organizations, Women's Organizations, Youth Groups, and church treasuries, throughout the Presbytery. (25c per church member from each church in the Presbytery would give us this amount.)

Your prayers and co-operation and support in this vital project of Presbytery is earnestly sought.

Rev. Mr. W. H. Allison reported for the Committee on Higher Education. The report was adopted with its recommendation as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION

Since the spring meeting of Presbytery the financial campaign for the proposed Consolidated College and the Program of Campus Christian Life has been vigorously conducted. Recognizing that the campaign has not kept up with the time schedule set for it and that there has been sizeable opposition in some sections, still the results of the campaign so far can certainly be said to be most encouraging. In three months the Synod has raised more than \$1,800,000, which is more than we have raised in any campaign of any length conducted by our Synod. Today the combined resources of the Consolidated College amount to almost \$5,000,000. This is the strongest support any Presbyterian institution or program has ever received.

Shortly before the meeting of Synod requests were made by the Peace College Alumnae Association with the Peace Board of Trustees and also by the Alumnae Association of Flora Macdonald College that Synod take steps that would consider continuing these colleges. These requests received long and careful consideration both by Synod's Committee on Higher Education and by the body of Synod itself. In view of the long study that had been made of the whole matter, the positive action that Synod took in 1955, and the large commitments Synod has already made concerning the Consolidated College, The Synod felt that we could not hesitate or turn back now and voted overwhelmingly to continue to support in the strongest possible manner the Board of Trustees of the Consolidated College as they seek to carry out the expressed direction of Synod in the merging of Peace, Flora Macdonald, and Presbyterian Junior Colleges and the future opening of the consolidated institution.

Recommendations

1. That Wilmington Presbytery redouble its efforts to enlist the support of every church in this campaign for the Consolidated College and Campus Christian Life.

The Committee reported that all written parts of the examination had been received and were satisfactory. Mr. Connette was admitted to examination, after a letter of dismissal from Nashville Presbytery had been read. The examination in Experimental Religion was conducted by the Rev. B. E. Dotson and was sustained. The examination on Theology was conducted by the Rev. Ben L. Rose and was sustained. The examination on Sacraments and Church

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF CHURCH EXTENSION TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

As your Committee presents its report to Presbytery, it is deeply grateful for God's many blessings during the months past. Not the least of these blessings are the loyalty of the members of this Committee, and the faithfulness and devotion of those men and their wives who have labored in our Home Mission fields. As we review the work of this Committee, we turn first to the Sub-Committee of Home Missions.

This Committee has worked closely with the Committee of which it is a vital part, and with Presbytery's Committee on the Minister and His Work. Changes have occurred in our Home Mission fields for various reasons. Some men have felt called of God to labor in other fields. One field has been made vacant by the retirement of its pastor, and one church made vacant by the reduction of the number of churches in the field. Still other changes have occurred by three of our churches calling their pastor for his full time. These changes have resulted in three new pastorates within the Presbytery.

Such changes have necessitated additional expense in Presbytery's work. In addition to the erection of new manses, where necessary, gifts have been made to some churches to aid in plant improvement. Salary supplements are paid to fourteen pastors serving twenty-four of our churches. And additional expenses in this work must be expected if proposed plans of new work are projected into reality. This means that if the Home Missions Committee carries on and enlarges its progressive program, Presbytery must think in terms of larger financial investment in this department of its work. The opportunity is almost unlimited.

The Sub-Committee on Evangelism has endeavored to bring the Presbytery face to face with its evangelistic opportunity. It is with joy that Dr. H. H. Thompson is welcomed as Synod's Director of Evangelism, for we feel sure that with his wise and experienced counsel our work in this area will become more effective.

Three Area meetings for Visitation-Evangelism will be conducted by Dr. Thompson within our Presbytery.

In co-operation with other Presbyteries' Committee on Evangelism in the Synod, your Committee shared in the setting up of an area Conference on Evangelism in Goldsboro on October 10. Some of you attended this meeting. More of the Presbytery should have been present to share in the experiences of the afternoon and evening.

The Sub-Committee on Negro Work reports forward steps in this area throughout our denomination. There are over five thousand members in our seventy-four Negro churches. As more and more Negroes are being graduated from college, our denomination is seeing the challenge in the field of enlightened worship, realizing that the emotional appeal which has marked Negro worship in past years has little appeal. Churches are being established in strategic areas and strong pastors are secured for these churches.

The Sub-Committee on Christian Relations made a special report at the last meeting of Presbytery, which was submitted to record. It has no report at this time except a verbal statement by its Chairman which, pending the adoption of this report, I trust Presbytery will hear.

COMMITTEE ON HOMES

In accordance with Section VI, Par. 3, sub-Par. f of the Manual of Wilmington Presbytery, the Committee on Homes has received the annual reports of the Boards of the Orphan's Home and the Presbyterian Home. As they were presented to the Synod of N. C., for our report we submit a portion of the report of the Orphan's Home and the report in full of the Presbyterian Home.

REPORT OF PRESBYTERIAN ORPHAN'S HOME

The blessings of God have been manifest in the life of the Home. We would acknowledge His goodness and express our gratitude for His loving kindness and provision for the needs of His children. The Regents have met in regular session twice during the year that has just closed. This governing body sets forth the policies and reviews the procedures of the total operation. The members of the Board have been faithful in their attendance and earnest in their desire to fulfill the duties incumbent upon them.

The doors of the Home are wide open for visitors and the year just closed has seen a record high number on the campus. In addition to the meeting of the Synod of North Carolina, the visit of the Women of the Synod of North Carolina, and the annual Fall Rally of 600 Men of Concord Presbytery, individuals and groups from over the Synod have visited the campus throughout the entire year. The most wonderful new thing on the campus is the church. It is the delight and joy of the boys and girls of the Home and stands on the campus as a great symbol for the Synod of North Carolina. Barium Springs is grateful for it and the Synod of North

Carolina, we believe is proud of it. The memorial gifts will soon finish the payment on the building.

The boys and girls of the Home are receiving excellent care. A general physical examination is given once a year and the services of the Infirmary on the campus, Dr. Bonner of Troutman and the Davis Hospital in Statesville, afford the best that can be offered for the children. The Presbyterian dentists through their special committee of Dr. Ralph Coffey of Morganton, Dr. Sam Steelman of Lincolnton, and Dr. Frank Kirk of Salisbury, have set up the dental office on the campus. Dr. Frank Kirk spends two days a week on the campus and is doing a most excellent work, not only in the field of dentistry, but in his association with the boys and girls.

The Presbytery will take note of the change in the school arrangements of the Home. Formerly, we have had what is technically a county school. The State has afforded the number of teachers necessary for the number of students at Barium Springs on the basis of the State teacher load. Having smaller classes, it meant that the Home had to supplement the number of teachers at its own expense. After careful study of the needs of the children, the Board voted unanimously to integrate the high school with the Troutman High School, one and one-half miles south, thus affording the children the opportunity of a normal community high school experience which will better fit them to leave the Home and join society. This will be begun in the fall of 1956 and will be completed in the fall of 1957. This move is in line with the common practice of child-caring institutions over the Southland.

The Home was operated in the year just closed without deficit. The books have been carefully audited by a professional firm and the report of this firm is on file in the Synod's office.

The Presbyterian Orphan's Home is equipped to take care of 250 children. At the close of the year there were 225 children in the Home. The applications during the year for boys far exceeded the space available, while applications for girls was rather low and left some vacancies in the girls' buildings.

REPORT OF THE PRESBYTERIAN HOME

The Board of Trustees respectfully reports the following major activities of the Presbyterian Home during the past year:

There was an average of 59.4 members in the Home and only two deaths.

A home for the Executive Director and his family was built on the Home's property at a cost of \$26,398.12. It was completed and occupied on July 1.

The second unit of the Home was completed in July, 1954, and was built at a total cost, including furnishings, of \$357,371.85. It was necessary to borrow only \$95,000 (on an open note) to pay for the building. As of July, 1956, the note had been reduced to \$57,000.

The Board of Trustees met for three regular sessions during the year. The Executive Committee met three times for the transaction of business.

The books of the Home were audited by A. M. Pullen Company, Certified Public Accountants, and the audit shows a capital net worth of \$613,700.55 as of December 31, 1955. Their report shows a gain in capital net worth for the year ending December 31, 1955 of \$35,658.64.

As each week goes by, the Board of Trustees sees the growing demand and need of additional facilities to care for our elderly people. As of the

present time, there are over forty active applications from persons who need the facilities of the Home on file. Additional facilities cannot come too soon for the growing number of people who need this Home.

The Board of Trustees has been studying a long-range plan for the Home, which includes the building of apartments. It is expected that before many months have passed construction will be started on approximately ten apartments.

The Board of Trustees sincerely hope that you will take any and every opportunity that you may have to visit the Home and see its facilities and the happiness of the people who reside here. Authorize the Trustees of Presbytery to: (1) borrow the sum of \$25,000 from the Board of Church Extension, Presbyterian Church, U. S., (2) loan the sum of \$25,000 to the Presbyterian Church of Jacksonville, N. C. for the purpose of financing the construction of a Sanctuary and Educational Building, taking the note and deed of execution by the Trustees of the Jacksonville Church as security for the loan, (3) transfer the note and deed of trust, given by the Trustees of the Jacksonville Church, to the Board of Church Extension as security for the loan from that board.

A resolution prepared by a local Attorney was presented by Rev. C. W. Worth, Chairman of the Home Mission Committee. Mr. Worth stated that the resolution had been discussed by the Home Mission Committee and was approved by the Committee for presenting to the Presbytery. The resolution is as follows:

WHEREAS, the First Presbyterian Church of Jacksonville is now engaged in a building extension program, and it has become necessary for the said church to borrow Twenty-five Thousand and 00/100 (\$25,000.00) Dollars and secure the same by the execution of a second lien deed of trust on the said church property; and

WHEREAS, The Board Of Church Extension Of The Presbyterian Church In The United States, Inc. has offered to lend to the Wilmington Presbytery the sum of Twenty-five Thousand and 00/100 (\$25,000.00) Dollars, with interest thereon at the rate of four (4%) per cent per annum, payable ten (10) years from date of loan, on condition that the said Twenty-five Thousand and 00/100 (\$25,000.00) Dollars be loaned by the said Wilmington Presbytery to the First Presbyterian Church of Jacksonville;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The Trustees of the Wilmington Presbytery are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute a note for Twenty-five Thousand and 00/100 (\$25,000.00) Dollars, bearing interest at the rate of four (4%) per cent per annum, and payable in quarterly installments of Six Hundred Twenty-five and 00/100 (\$625.00) Dollars, plus interest, to the order of The Board Of Church Extension Of The Presbyterian Church In The United States, Inc.

2. That the Trustees of the Wilmington Presbytery are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to loan to the Trustees of the First Presbyterian Church of Jacksonville the entire proceeds of the loan hereinabove mentioned and shall take as evidence of said debt a note from the Trustees of the First Presbyterian Church of Jacksonville to the Trustees of the Wilmington Presbytery and said note shall bear interest at the rate of four (4%) per cent per annum and shall become due and payable in quarterly installments of Six Hundred Twenty-five and 00/100 (\$625.00) Dollars each, plus interest, and as security for said note the said Trustees of the Wilmington Presbytery shall demand of and receive from the Trustees of the First Presbyterian Church of Jacksonville a deed of trust conveying the lands and premises on which the said First Presbyterian Church of Jacksonville is located.

3. The Trustees of the Wilmington Presbytery are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to transfer, set-over and assign the Twenty-five Thousand and 00/100 (\$25,000.00) Dollars note delivered to them by the Trustees of the First Presbyterian Church of Jacksonville to The Board Of Church Extension Of The Presbyterian Church In The United States, Inc., or any other person, firm or corporation it may designate, as collateral security for the Twenty-five Thousand and 00/100 (\$25,000.00) Dollars note executed by the Trustees of this Presbytery mentioned in Item 1 above.

Rev. M. G. Stimpson offered a motion that the Presbytery adopt the resolution. The motion was seconded by Rev. M. C. McChesney, after discussion the motion received the unanimous vote of the Presbytery.

The purpose for which the meeting was called having been accomplished the Presbytery adjourned with prayer.
