## STATED MEETING

October 20, 1959

The 208th Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of Wilmington was held in the Lake Waccamaw Presbyterian Church, of Lake Waccamaw, North Carolina, October 20, 1959 opening at 10:00 a.m.

The service of worship was led by the retiring moderator, the Rev. J. S. Walkup.

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A quorum was declared present.

Presbytery was constituted with prayer by the Moderator, remembering the Rev. Reid Erwin who lost his father by death recently.

Ruling Elder George L. Mitchell was elected Moderator.

The following ministers were introduced and invited to sit as visiting brothers:

Dr. A. G. Harris, Jr., Atlanta Presbytery; The Rev. Joe Amory, Albemarle Presbytery; the Rev. H. L. Reaves, Pee Dee Presbytery.

The following elders attending Presbytery for the first time were introduced:

J. M. Jenkins, Jr., A. L. Warner, John E. Thompson, Herbert A. Codington, Jr., P. D. Lanier.

The Rev. J. S. Russell, host pastor welcomed Presbytery and made the necessary announcements. He then introduced the Rev. E. D. Dunn, director of the Good Shepherd Home and Mr. R. N. McCray, director of Boy's Home, Inc. They were given the privilege of the floor to speak relative to their respective organizations.

The docket was adopted as amended.

It was moved that, upon the evidence of the telegram from the Stated Clerk of Pee Dee Presbytery, stating that the Rev. H. L. Reaves of Florence, South Carolina, had been dismissed to the Presbytery of Wilmington, he be admitted to examination, and that the Commission of Installation be instructed to receive the letter of dismissal upon its arrival.

The Rev. Mr. Reaves was examined. The examination on "*Views of Theology*" was led by the Rev. J. M. Irvine, Jr. It was sustained as satisfactory. The examination on "*Views of the Sacraments and Church Government*" led by the Rev. E. G. Connette, Jr., was sustained as satisfactory. The examination on "*Experimental Religion*" led by the Rev. M. C. MacQueen was sustained as satisfactory. The examination as a whole was sustained as satisfactory and Mr. Reaves was enrolled as a member of Wilmington Presbytery upon the signing of the obligations.

The Chairman of the Commission on the Minister and His Work, the Rev. M. J. McChesney, reported the calls to be in order. The terms were as follows: Tabor City Church—\$1,200.00 per annum with one month's vacation, manse and participation in M.A.F. Brunswick Church—\$1,200.00 per annum, with one month's vacation and participation in M.A.F. The Home Missions Committee to supplement the salary to bring it to the required minimum of Presbytery.

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The official auditor's report was presented. Three copies were on hand—one for the Council of Presbytery, one for the office of Presbytery, one for the permanent file of the treasurer.

The Rev. J. S. Russell presented his resignation as pastor of the Lake Waccamaw and White Plains Churches, requesting a letter of dismissal to Pee Dee Presbytery effective November 8th. Representatives of the churches reported that duly called congregational meetings were held and that the churches reluctantly concurred in the request. The request was granted. Expressions of good will and appreciation were made by various members of Presbytery. The stated clerk was instructed to send a letter to the stated clerk of Pee Dee Presbytery expressing the esteem the Presbytery holds for Mr. Russell.

The Rev. C. W. Worth presented the report of the Executive Committee on Church Extension. It was adopted as follows:

### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Since its last annual report, this committee has lost one of its sub-committees, Christian Relations having become a Permanent Committee of Presbytery. The Committee of Church Extension now functions through sub-committees on *Home Missions, Negro Work, Evangelism, and Radio and Television.*

#### NEGRO WORK

The Presbytery still has no direct work among this large segment of the population of our immediate area. In this regard, we are in a less favorable position than forty years ago. The only Negro Presbyterian church in Wilmington is the Chestnut Street Church, UP—USA. However, both the Women of the Presbytery, and the Men of the Presbytery have sponsored Negro leaders to attend leadership conferences in the state. We urge the extension of this program, and call upon local churches to study earnestly and prayerfully the will of our Lord in the matter of our Negro Christian brethren, and the task of evangelising the large unchurched Negro population in the bounds of this Presbytery.

#### RADIO AND TELEVISION

Many of our churches are making use of the miracle of modern communications to proclaim the gospel. In Wilmington, Presbyterians participate actively in an interdenominational program under the auspices of the Ministerial Association, with daily devotionals on three local radio stations and a television station that serves southeastern North Carolina. Two of our churches also broadcast their Sunday services in rotation with other churches in the down-town area.

In Wallace, the Wallace and Rockfish Churches participate in a daily devotional program, with other Protestant Churches, and take a regular turn in broadcasting Sunday services. Churches in Clinton, Whiteville, Morehead City, and Jacksonville take part in similar programs. We commend to our people the work of the Protestant Radio Center in Atlanta, and urge study by sessions of the use of modern means of telling the Gospel story by these methods which God has provided. We remind the Presbytery that neglect of these media in any community places them

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in the hands of non-Christian, or religiously irresponsible forces. Many of the so-called religious programs broadcast in this section are an offense to the gospel and a stumbling block to real Christian evangelism.

### EVANGELISM

It is with sincere hope that in 1959 evangelism in Wilmington Presbytery will show forth a better record than in 1958.

The minister and elders who were commissioners to the General Assembly, Atlanta, Georgia, all attended the Pre-Assembly Conference on Evangelism.

Each minister of Wilmington Presbytery has been urged to keep constantly before him a Prospect List. At the spring meeting of Wilmington Presbytery it was unanimously approved that each church would conduct a Church Loyalty Campaign for a six-week period beginning Sunday, September 20 through Sunday, October 25. In this period each church was to have one of her services on Sunday with special evangelistic emphasis. Each church was to endeavor to get every member of the church to attend at least one of the regular services of the church every Sunday for this six-week period. Also, to work toward a 10% increase in membership. We are hoping to see results in evangelism for Wilmington Presbytery as a result of the year's emphasis and climaxing it with this Church Loyalty Campaign. Over half the churches answered in written form signifying their endeavor in this Church Loyalty Campaign.

### HOME MISSIONS

As of today 27 of the 82 churches of the Presbytery are being served by ministers who receive portions of their salaries from the funds of Home Missions. This percentage is high but if you will take note of the number of small churches in the Presbytery you will readily understand why this is true. The emphasis being placed on stewardship this year in all of our churches by the Stewardship committee promises to bring about an appreciable decrease in the amount of sustentation needed in 1960.

There have been some changes among the pastors serving these churches during past year. Rev. James A. Marrow left the Cape Fear Church to accept a pastorate in Concord Presbytery. He was succeeded by Rev. Francis M. Womack, Jr. Rev. Richard K. Johnson left the Woodburn church to accept a call to the Westminster church. He was succeeded at Woodburn by Rev. Randolph W. Graham. The Black River, Caswell and Currie churches which were without a regular pastor for more than a year are now being served by Rev. Henry L. Willis. In June of this year Rev. Adolf Ottersen began work with the Rocky Point and Pike churches, and Rev. George Sowerby began his work at Topsail. Robert Ledbetter who supplied the Tabor City and Brunswick churches for more than a year left to resume his studies at the Seminary. These churches have called Rev. Henry L. Reaves, of Florence, S. C. He has accepted their call and expects to begin work December 1st. Rev. William Kimbro, who has supplied Stafford Memorial and Harmony churches for the past year, left in August to accept work in Albemarle Presbytery. Rev. Coswell G. Johnstone, a retired minister of the A.S.A.U.P. church, now making his home in Wilmington, has been engaged to supply these churches. Ministers who continue their labors among us are J. F. Clark at Beth Car and Oakdale; W. F. F. Little at Pollockville and Croatan; Robert J. Wilkins at Teachey, Willard and Oak Plains; Ira H. Rawls at Chinquapin and Salem; John L. Stevenson at Page's Mill; William E. Pauley at Southport and New Hope; William P. Burns at the Chapel on the Boardwalk;

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J. W. Brown at Maple Hill and Pineland; Dr. L. C. LaMotte continues to serve Bladenboro as Supply.

Salary sustentation is being continued for the support of Parish Visitors in the Jacksonville and Trinity churches. The Synod and the General Assembly share equally with the Presbytery in these sustentations.

Grants-in-aid were made during the year to assist our churches for new construction as follows: Carolina Beach \$750.00 to repair the church steeple; Southport \$2,500.00 plus the proceeds from the sale of the Fellowship building; Rocky Point-Pike \$5,000.00 for the purchase of a lot for the proposed relocation of the churches and building fund; Delgado \$5,000.00 for construction of Fellowship Hall and Educational building; Woodburn \$1,000.00 to assist in manse renovations and installation of kitchen appliances. In addition to these grants-in-aid we have paid \$5,637.00 on loans made in past years for grants-in-aid.

Some of the newer members of the Presbytery may be interested in knowing how the committee came to be in debt. The indebtedness represents money the committee borrowed for the purpose of making grants-in-aid to churches. Most of the money was used in aiding new churches.

The first of these was the Little Chapel on the Boardwalk at Wrightsville Beach. For many years the First church, Wilmington, sponsored a Sunday School on the beach during the summer months. When World War II brought a great influx of people to the area and many of them rented houses on the beach the Sunday School became a year 'round project and preaching services were added. These were housed in a small frame building. The need was felt for a more adequate building and program and the Home Mission Committee undertook the task of providing for this need. An individual had made a challenge gift of \$10,000.00 for this cause. The First church, Wilmington put on a campaign among its members and raised \$7,200.00. Lots were purchased and plans drawn for a building. The committee made a grant-in-aid for the building of \$5,000.00 which was borrowed from the Board of Church Extension. In addition the committee purchased a manse at a cost of \$8,750.00 which was financed through the Savings and Loan Company. Final payments were made on those loans this year. Today this is a thriving and growing church with physical properties worth approximately \$100,000.00.

The story of the Acme church is similar to that of the Little Chapel on the Boardwalk. We had a small home mission church in the village of Acme. It was about forty years old and its membership numbered less than forty. When the Riegel Paper Co. built a plant and number of homes two miles from Acme the Home Mission Committee began thinking in terms of relocating the Acme church in the community of Riegelwood. The first step in the project was the securing of a pastor and the second step was building a manse. The manse was built at a cost of \$9,000.00 of which \$7,500.00 was borrowed. When the building was under construction the Committee made a grant-in-aid of \$7,000.00, and later a supplementary grant of \$4,000.00, again this was borrowed money. On these loans the Committee now owes \$510.00 which we expect to pay off by the end of the year. Acme is now a thriving and growing church with a property worth easily \$50,000.00.

The story of Trinity Church, in Havelock, is a somewhat similar story, namely operating mainly on borrowed capital. The Committee owned an acre of land in Havelock, purchased in 1945 at a cost of \$250.00. This was sold in 1954 for \$15,000.00 which gave us a start

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on a church building. A Sunday School, sponsored by the Morehead City Church, was begun in a rented apartment. About the same time a Sunday morning preaching program was begun. The Sunday School outgrew the space of the apartment and the school moved to new school building. A few months later this building was closed to us and we moved to the Community Center. In the meantime our own building was under construction.

A pastor was secured for this church and a manse became necessary. The committee appropriated \$9,000.00 for the manse and the men of the church furnished the labor. Of this \$9,000.00 the amount of \$7,500.00 was borrowed capital. In addition the committee made grants-in-aid in the aggregate of \$5,000.00. The Synod donated \$5,000.00 and the Assembly \$14,000.00. Today Trinity is a thriving church with physical properties worth not less than \$100,000.00.

The story of the Jacksonville Church and the Cape Fear Church are similar to that of the Acme Church, namely, relocation and the construction of new buildings, with the exception that the only funds borrowed were for a manse for the Cape Fear Church. This cost \$12,000.00 of which \$10,000.00 was borrowed. Manses for Bethel and McClure Churches were likewise financed mainly by borrowed capital.

The Committee is happy to report to the Presbytery that by the end of this year there will be only two of the loans outstanding, those of the Cape Fear and McClure Memorial manses. On these we owe a total of \$14,000.00. This amount, by the end of this year will be our total outstanding obligation.

Time does not permit us to mention more than a score of other churches which have been assisted in new construction to the extent of from \$1,000.00 to \$3,000.00, during this five year period.

The Committee takes this opportunity to express sincere and heartfelt thanks to all the churches of the Presbytery for their continuous support of Home Missions. In addition to the churches, we are most grateful to the individuals who twice a year contribute to the Church and Manse Assistance Fellowship. This fund, which was begun in 1953, has supported grants-in-aid to the total of \$10,408.00. We also register our sincere thanks and appreciation to the Belk-Beery Store for their annual and continuous support of Home Missions. For thirteen consecutive years this store has contributed \$2,000.00 per year to church extension in Wilmington Presbytery—a total of \$26,000.00. Through these years, Home Missions in our Presbytery has also had the generous cooperation and support of the Committee of Church Extension in the Synod and the Board of Church Extension in the General Assembly.

The committee is not unmindful of the fact that grants-in-aid from Home Mission resources is but a small portion of the total cost of the construction projects. The great portion of the costs has been paid by the members of the local churches. Our portion has, however, given the local congregations the challenge and encouragement to undertake their own building projects.

### RECOMMENDATIONS TO PRESBYTERY FROM THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE

(October 20, 1959)

That the Presbytery instruct its Trustees James H. Clark, J. K. Bannerman, E. Walker Stevens to accept title to a tract of land of twenty-six acres more or less, situated in Columbus County near Bolton, and instruct

the Stated Clerk to express the thanks of the Presbytery to Mrs. Laura Howell Norden for this generous contribution to Home Missions.

That the Presbytery accept an offer of the sum of \$600.00 for the purchase of the Cypress Chapel building and grounds, situated near Chinquapin, and instruct its Trustees James H. Clark, J. K. Bannerman, E. Walker Stevens to convey title in fee simple to Mr. E. P. James, upon the receipt of the above sum.

That the Presbytery exchange the Southport Manse plus a cash sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 for the Southport residence of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Schmidt, if this offer should meet with the approval of Mr. and Mrs. Schmidt. In the event this offer should be satisfactory to Mr. and Mrs. Schmidt, that the Presbytery instruct its Trustees James H. Clark, J. K. Bannerman, E. Walker Stevens to convey title in fee simple to the Southport manse to Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Schmidt and accept title in fee simple to the Southport residence of Mr. and Mrs. Schmidt. That the Executive Secretary of the Presbytery act as the agent for the Presbytery in this transaction.

It was moved that the Committee on Church Extension investigate the need of reorganization regarding TRAV, in order to comply with the General Assembly organization.

The report of the Permanent Committee on Christian Relations read by the Rev. J. R. MacKinnon was adopted as follows:

### REPORT OF THE PERMANENT COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN RELATIONS

At the direction of the General Assembly, Synod and Presbytery Committees on Christian Relations have been reorganized to conform to the pattern of the Assembly's Committee. Therefore Presbytery's Committee is no longer a sub-committee of the Executive Committee of Church Extension, but has been reorganized as a permanent committee of Presbytery, with representation on Presbytery's Council, and on Synod's Committee on Christian Relations. Your committee now makes, therefore an independent written report to Presbytery, and is docketed for report at the fall meeting.

In this first annual report under its new status, the committee calls to the attention of Presbytery the informative materials provided by the Division of Christian Action of the Board of Christian Education. We commend these publications, particularly *"The Bridge"* to the careful study of our churches, in order that our people may be informed concerning the great Christian issues of the day.

While some progress has been made in the critical areas of social tension in the nation and in our state, there can be no excuse for complacency or lethargy concerning the church's witness in the field of human relations. The past attitude has too often been one of surrendering the leadership in social and moral matters to secular and non-Christian forces which are undermining the witness of our faith. To deny the relevance of the Gospel in these major areas of life is to deny the sufficiency of Christ for the world. The impotence of the church to bring an end to bitterness and violence in the recent industrial strife in North Carolina, when leaders of both factions were church members in good standing, is a disturbing indication of our need of prayer and self-searching.

## MINUTES OF WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

Obscene literature and entertainment are on the increase in the territory of this Presbytery. Alcoholism continues to be a growing problem. Juvenile delinquency, including indications of gang warfare are appearing in our communities. Inadequate care for the aged and indigent, problems of mental health and disrupted home life, industrial and racial hostilities, and other evils to which the church has spoken through the General Assembly are with us here and now. Your Committee submits with all urgency that the Presbytery and its constituent churches cannot remain insensitive to these things and be true to their obligation to the Head of the Church.

We recommend that church sessions undertake serious studies of moral conditions in their immediate vicinity, and that churches lead in the establishment of local councils of churches or other agencies of Protestant community cooperation in solving the serious social conditions that beset our section.

The retiring moderator, Ruling Elder George L. Mitchell, made some pertinent remarks regarding observations during his term of office.

### SOME OBSERVATIONS AND THOUGHTS OF A RETIRING RULING ELDER MODERATOR

Your retiring Moderator asks your indulgence while he brings to you some observations and thoughts concerning Presbytery.

Paragraph 1 of Section VIII of Presbytery's Manual reads:

*All Ministers who are members of Presbytery shall be required to attend the stated meetings of the Presbytery, and as far as practicable the called meetings of the Presbytery.*

A glance through the minutes of the last four *stated* meetings for which minutes have been distributed (October 1958-July 1959) shows that the *attendance* has been commendably high on the part of Ministers living within the bounds of Presbytery. (At *called* meetings their attendance was much lower).

But how about that portion of Paragraph 6 of the same section which reads:

*Each Church Session shall give due consideration to the importance of having a Representative at each stated meeting of Presbytery.*

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That is where we are negligent. At the four *stated* meetings referred to, ranging from a low of twelve (12) to a high of thirty-two (32) so-called *active* churches did not send Representatives to Presbytery. In analyzing this situation, we find

that five (5) Churches did not send a Representative to even one of the four meetings;

that nine (9) others were represented at *only* one of the four; and

that sixteen (16) other Churches were represented at only two of the four meetings.

So much for the voting attendance at Presbytery.

Now let's consider the matter of *participation* at Presbytery:

Reflection on the functions of Presbytery must lead to the logical conclusion that our Ministers must necessarily take the lead in its deliberations. This does not mean, however, that the Ruling Elder is expected to be a listener only. Our denomination dignifies the office of Ruling Elder, not only in the local Church but in the courts of Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly. And in our own Presbytery he is further recognized by being chosen Moderator alternately with a Minister. Why, then, have some Ruling Elders, who represent over half the voting strength of Presbytery, said that the Ministers control and run Presbytery?

I give all due recognition to the Ministers in Wilmington Presbytery, who labor in and out of season; and I also pay tribute to those Ruling Elders and Deacons, as well as some women, who make up a substantial segment of the Committees of Presbytery, and who, in so many ways, lead us on to greater accomplishments in the work of the Kingdom.

Why does this situation of Church representation and Ruling Elder participation exist, and how can it be improved? The reason and answer lies within the Sessions with Ruling Elders and Teaching Elders alike responsible. It seems to me that each Pastor-Moderator should periodically discuss with his Session, or Sessions, the over-all importance of Presbytery in our form of Church Government, and its functioning—going into the details of its organization and actions and posting Sessions on forthcoming meetings, particularly seeing that a Representative is chosen who will attend Presbytery and fully informing him as to matters on the docket.

And then, too, have we overlooked that other clause in Paragraph 6, Section VIII, of Presbytery's manual that each Church Session *shall* give due consideration to the importance of hearing its representative's report of the meeting of Presbytery? If this further direction is regularly complied with, how much better would our Elders be informed, our meetings of Presbytery enriched, and our Churches advanced in heeding the Lord's command, "Rise, let us be going."

The Rev. E. G. Connette, Jr., was elected Moderator.

The Rev. C. G. Johnstone was introduced and invited to sit as a visiting brother.

Miss Blanche Garrett, of the Board of Church Extension, was introduced.

Ruling Elders attending Presbytery for the first time were introduced as follows:

C. G. Bennett, C. H. Beery, A. D. McNeil, A. S. Bethune, F. H. Parker, Ward Farrior, Wiley Batson, Graham Teachey, W. T. Benton, Jerry O.

The Rev. James Atwood, host pastor, welcomed Presbytery, introduced members of the Wallace Session and made the necessary announcements.

The Stated Clerk read the communications which were referred to the proper committees.

The docket was adopted as amended.

The Rev. N. P. Farrow made the report of the World Mission Committee. Mrs. R. T. Sinclair, Chairman of World Missions of Wilmington Presbyterial spoke on the "World Mission Conference" held at Montreat each year. The report was adopted as follows:

### REPORT OF THE WORLD MISSION COMMITTEE TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

January 19, 1960

It is written that once a long time ago the sun stood still. But where the acts or the relations of men are concerned, neither sun nor earth stands still today. Truly today "Each breeze that sweeps the ocean brings tidings from afar of nations in commotion." Among the tidings is the record that Zion's war waged for so long a time, grows more intense.

From lands where the far reach of our work is extended, we shall mention first those missions in which we have no missionaries, but help support work that is being done by other personnel.

*First is Iraq.* On July 14, 1958 the monarchy was overthrown, and a republic set up. Though republican in name, the government is essentially a dictatorship. Activities of missionaries of the Christian religion have been drastically reduced. Some missionaries have had to leave the country on short notice. The primary school of our American School for Girls in Bagdad was not permitted to open in the fall of 1958, because it was supported by foreign funds. All missionaries in Iraq are now permitted only in Bagdad and Bosrah. This limitation is attributed to political rather than religious motives.

*Next let us look at Ecuador.* This field, high in the Andes, a mission among the Indians there, and to some white people, after thirteen years of work in agriculture, medical clinics, education, and direct Gospel proclamation, has begun to bear significant fruit. The beginning was difficult, because of the suspicion the Indians had of white men. 1958 was the most encouraging year so far.

*Japan is represented* in the meeting of Presbytery by one of our own missionaries. His direct account is more stimulating and by far more inclusive than any report we could bring in this brief report. But let us note that the World Sunday School Convention met in Tokyo in 1958 and that 1959 was celebrated as the 100th anniversary year of our mission work there. Japan has been a difficult field, because of the difficulty of finding hearts receptive to the Christian message, and of conditions under which missionaries have often labored. The medical work, the latest department introduced there, has been a means of a helpful and fruitful contact with the people.

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*Korea*, from the beginning of mission work there, one of the most responsive to the Christian message, still is responsive to the Gospel. The evangelistic and educational work go on steadily. Medical work is heavily taxed as it deals with two prevalent diseases: tuberculosis and leprosy. What we are doing for the relief of suffering through medical work deserves a lot of space, which we are not able to give. (For this matter, and for all information on the work of our Church in all fields of our work, please take time to examine the reports of the World Mission Committee, which are supplied to every minister in our Church, and see also articles in church publications). The unhappy division within the Presbyterian Church in Korea seems to show some signs of being relieved, according to a recent report by a visitor to that country.

*Mexico*. In this field our medical work remains very important. Our hospital at Morelia is conducting a training school for nurses. This school had seventy-two girls registered in 1958, of whom twelve were to graduate in February 1959. This is a nationally accredited school, and its graduates are in demand all over the nation. The student homes for youth attending government schools, the Bible schools, and the Seminary continue to fulfill their mission.

*Taiwan*. No field in our work seems to have a more impressive work and to yield the fruit of the Gospel than Taiwan. Though smaller than some of our other missions, it is very active. A marked part of this work is with the aborigenes, the mountain men, among whom there used to be many headhunters. They seem to have an inclination to become Presbyterians, and many converts are baptized.

*Brazil* is a country of progress. Much like the expansion of our own country to the West in the second and third quarters of the 19th century, Brazil is opening and settling her great West. Pioneer missionaries move along with pioneer farmers and business men into the great new back-country empire. The moving of the capital of the country into the interior, requiring the building of a new city, Brasilia, is a rather rare historical phenomenon. Our church is already on the spot in the new capital, ministering to the temporary population of builders, many of whom may become permanent residents. Suitable property for the erection of church buildings has been purchased. A distinctive feature of our work in Brazil is that we have three missions there, not just one. We cooperate with the native church, finding our major functions in pioneer work, especially in the developing frontier; in the educational work; and in the Seminary. Details of this work are interesting; but space does not permit them in this report. 1959 was the 100th anniversary year of the Presbyterian Church in Brazil. The very live and aggressive Presbyterian Church in Brazil has conducted for several years a program of evangelism leading to this anniversary and their labors were very fruitful.

*Africa or Congo Mission*. Our mission there is in the heart of that great dark continent that is now in turmoil, and some features of that turmoil have been active not far from our mission country. We see a civilization being born. Our mission originally was not primarily to introduce Western civilization. But the introduction of a people to the Gospel of Jesus Christ carries with it the introduction to the most significant things in a Christian civilization—scientific knowledge and civil government, as well as religion. Africa is perhaps the most critical of all our mission fields. Where the darkness of ignorance and superstition is being dissipated by the light of western civilization, the sins of civilization are joining with the sins of savagery to keep the continent dark. But here the Church pioneered the schools, the hospital, and the building of the Church, and continues to minister to the needs of the people with ad-

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vancing means, and in advancing patterns as the civilization advances. The Church reaches farther, and touches more aspects of life than ever before. Indicative and illustrative of this is the gift of the beautiful church at Bakwanga, seating 500 people by the Diamond Mining Company, in the world's greatest commercial diamond center. Not long ago this company's officials remained uncooperative as the Company opposed to all Protestant work in its camp.

At present an intensive campaign for money, clothing, blankets, etc., is being conducted because of disasters in several parts of the world.

Mrs. Sinclair has compiled the following information about certain activities showing expression of interest within our Presbytery (1959):

1. Self-denial offering of entire church membership \$4,829.09.
2. One church indicated desire to partially support a missionary.
3. An increase in interest and shipment of professional medicine samples to mission hospitals by the men of the church.
4. World Mission Committees. Some churches worked effectively with a committee composed of one member from each adult department.
5. Sermons. Many ministers preached World Mission sermons during February, with gratifying results.
6. Dr. Sandy Marks spoke in each of the six districts, visiting a total of nine churches. Rev. D. A. McLean three, and Dr. Tinsley Smith one.
7. World Mission Conference. Ten young people, two women and one woman candidate for mission service attended the Conference at Montreat.

The Committee recommends:

1. That the churches of the Presbytery observe the special season of study of and prayer for World Missions in February and March.
2. That, in as much as it may be feasible the churches observe the week of Prayer and Self-denial (Feb. 28-Mar. 6) as recommended by the Nashville office.
3. That ministers read carefully the pamphlet supplied by the Nashville office on specific needs that may be met by a church, and the list of services needing various qualified personnel to fill them.

The Rev. F. A. Elliott, Chairman of Women's Work presented Mrs. Adolf Otersen, Sr., President of the Wilmington Presbyterial, who was given the privilege of the floor in order to present the President's report. The report was adopted as follows:

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH OF WILMINGTON PRESBYTERIAL, 1959

The Women of the Church of Wilmington Presbytery, after having studied 1st Peter and Revelation have been increasingly aware of their responsibility as a "World-Wide Witness," beginning at home, in the community, and through out the world.

Cost of Presbyterial Programs was \$34.61 for 600 copies.

The Women of the Church is composed of 74 organizations, 4,856 members, 6 districts, and 228 circles. We regret that this is two less than last year.

In March the District Conferences were held in the six districts with a total of 599 members attending. The theme was "World-Wide Witness". The Committee Chairman attended each of these and presented the various phases of the work. The offering amounted to \$319.45. Because of our interest in Christian Education and our fervent desire that young people will enter into full-time Christian service or become better Christian citizens, our offering went towards increasing our Flora Macdonald scholarship, which goes to an outstanding and needy girl. At present we are giving \$100.00 annually, which is the interest on \$2000.00 It is hoped that with the Presbyterian offering this amount can be increased to \$125.00 annually. Our goal is to further increase this, making it more beneficial to the recipient.

It is with deep gratitude that a young girl of our Presbytery is the recipient of our Synodical Scholarship, the Alice Johnson Scholarship, and is attending the Presbyterian School of Christian Education, formerly Assembly's Training School.

There are now two young girls from our Presbytery attending the Presbyterian School of Christian Education.

The Birthday offering amounted to \$2,074.12. A small decrease over last year and went towards the building of a Training School for Lay Workers in Brazil. The per capita giving for North Carolina was 47c, the second lowest per capita.

We exceeded our apportionment for Synod's Office Building in Raleigh — \$892.00

Several organizations went the second mile and contributed towards the Flora Macdonald Infirmary.

5 Life Memberships were given.

White Cross has met its full quota and went to the Yodogawa Christian Hospital in Osaka Japan.

24 of our women attended Synodical Training School at Queens College.

20 Colored delegates attended Interdenominational Conference at Winston Salem.

Our women are praying diligently that many will hear the call and surrender their lives to full-time Christian service. As evidence to answered prayer, 10 of our young people and 3 adults attended World-

Mission Conference in Montreat. 2 young people reported attending Church Extension Conference (this is not a complete report). 1 organization sent a young person to Senior-Hi Conference.

Your World-Mission Chairman and Church Extension Chairman arranged an itinerary through the Presbytery for Dr. Sandy Marks and Dr. and Mrs. Bisceglia during World Mission and Church Extension season. An increased interest in Missions was manifested. Much work has been done among the migrants. Slides on this work were shown in several churches. It is hoped that more churches will avail themselves of the opportunity of these slides, depicting some of our work and needs among the migrants.

Many of our churches have responded to the appeal for over-seas relief by contributing clothing. One pound per member has been asked for and the past year only  $\frac{1}{3}$  pound per member was given (on the Assembly level). Let's try and meet our goal in 1960 by giving 4,856 pounds to the less fortunate overseas, remembering the words of our Master, "*Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me.*"

There are many things that have not been reported and only God knows the final report — but these are a few tangible evidences of our interest in the work of His Kingdom.

Another year brings another emphases. May we not forget that "World-Wide Witness" is not just a 1959 emphasis but that it is an ever-present theme and the overall mission of the church.
