WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY, CALLED MEETING

Sept. 8, 1960, 4 P.M.

St. Andrews-Covenant Presbyterian Church

The Presbytery of Wilmington met in response to the call of the Moderator on Thursday, September 8, 1960, 4 p.m., St. Andrews-Covenant Presbyterian Church, Wilmington, N. C.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, the Rev. Dr. L. A. Taylor, and was opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. L. A. Richardson.

2. Dissolving the pastoral relationship between the Reverend William M. Schotanus and the First Presbyterian Church of Jacksonville, and granting Dr. Schotanus a letter of dismissal to the Presbytery of Mecklenburg;
3. Taking such action as may grow out of the above matters."

Mitchell and the Presbyterian Church of Carolina Beach, effective September 30th, and granted permission for Mr. Mitchell to labor outside the boundaries of the Presbytery, as public relations work for American Red Cross, Mecklenburg

THE 212TH STATED MEETING OF WILMINGTON

ACME PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Acme, North Carolina

The Presbytery of Wilmington met at the Acme Presbyterian Church, Acme, North Carolina, at 10 a.m., October 18, 1960, with the Rev. L. A. Taylor, Retiring Moderator, presiding, who conducted the opening Service of Worship. The meeting was constituted with prayer.

A quorum was declared present.

Mr. Luther Powell, Ruling Elder in the Wallace Church, was elected moderator.

The letter of dismissal from Holston Presbytery for the Rev. J. B. Tubbs was read. Mr. Tubbs was received for examination. The Rev. J. R. MacKinnon moderated the examination. The Rev. M. C. MacQueen led the examination on "Experimental Religion." It was sustained. The examination on "Views of Theology" was led by the Rev. J. R. MacKinnon. It was sustained as satisfactory. The examination on "Church Government and the Sacrament" was led by the Rev. E. G. Connette, Jr. It was sustained as satisfactory. The examination as a whole was sustained as satisfactory.

Mr. Tubbs was enrolled as a member of Wilmington Presbytery.

The call of the Presbytery to Mr. Tubbs as Executive Secretary was read and found in order as follows: salary—\$6,000.00, manse, and utilities; family participation in M.A.F. and Group Insurance; car expenses at 8c per mile, and a month vacation annually.

The call was placed in his hands and Mr. Tubbs indicated his acceptance. Mr. Tubbs read aloud the obligations of Presbytery, affirmed and signed them.

The following commission was approved for the installation: the Rev. J. R. MacKinnon, to propound the constitutional questions; the Rev. M. C. MacQueen, to charge the Presbytery; the Rev. Walter Goodman to charge the minister; and the sermon of Dr. L. A. Taylor, was made a part of the installation service. The assigned parts were carried out. Mr. Tubbs was declared duly

The Communications were read and referred to the proper committees.

The Rev. Will Terry, host minister, welcomed the Presbytery to the Acme Church and made the necessary announcements.

The docket was adopted as amended.

Paul Woodall, Jr., of the First Church, Whiteville was presented as a candidate for the Gospel Ministry by the Rev. W. H. Goodman, Chairman of Candidates. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Woodall, were introduced. The Rev. J. R. MacKinnon led the examination on "Experimental Religion and Motives for Seeking the Ministry." The examination was sustained as satisfactory and he was enrolled as a Candidate for the Gospel Ministry under the care of Wilmington Presbytery. The constitutional questions were propounded by the moderator. The Rev. C. W. Worth, pastor of the candidate, delivered a charge to the candidate and led the Presbytery in prayer.

James Raymond Frisby, a candidate under the care of St. Louis Presbytery, was admitted to examination on the basis of a letter from the Stated Clerk of St. Louis Presbytery that a letter of dismissal would be forthcoming. The statement regarding his academic education and assigned written parts were accepted as follows:

Thesis: "John Calvin's Doctrine of the Atonement in the Sight of the New Testament."

Exegesis: Isaiah 40: 1-11. Sermon—Ephesians 4:1-16.

The Rev. J. R. MacKinnon moderated the examination. The Rev. M. C. MacQueen led the examination on "Experimental Religion and Motives for Seeking the Ministry." It was sustained as satisfactory. The Rev. D. B. Jenkins led the examination on the "Knowledge of Theology." It was sustained. The Rev. Charles Williams led the examination on "Church Government and the Sacraments." It was sustained. The Rev. H. H. Hilton led the examination on "English Bible." It was sustained as satisfactory. The examination as a whole was sustained as satisfactory. The Presbytery voted to dispense with the sermon. The call of the Pink Hill Church was read as follows: Salary \$4,000.00, and \$300.00 auto allowance, manse and utilities; participation in M.A.F. and Group Insurance; one month vacation annually. The call was found in order and placed in his hands. He indicated his acceptance, effective Dec. 1st, 1960.

The Commission to Ordain and Install Mr. Frisby was appointed as follows: The Rev. L. A. Taylor, to preside and propound the constitutional questions; the Rev. N. P. Farrior, to charge the congregation; the Rev. L. A. Richardson, to charge the minister; the Rev. Reid Erwin, minister alternate, Ruling Elder Ned Roberts, with W. H. Henderson as alternate. The service is to be held Dec. 4, 1960, 7:30 p.m. at the Pink Hill Church. The Presbytery extended an invitation to the Rev. W. B. Oglesby, Union Seminary, to participate with the Commission by preaching the sermon.

The Commission was instructed to receive the letter of dismissal from St. Louis Presbytery, and to enroll him as a member of Wilmington Presbytery upon his ordination and the signing of the Obligations.

The following Standing Committees were appointed:

Leave of Absence: R. H. Erwin, C. L. Kirby, W. S. Wells.

Resolutions and Thanks: L. A. Richardson, James Justice, W. H. Goodman.

Place of Next Meeting: E. G. Connette, Jr., G. E. Fisler.

Presbytery recessed for lunch with prayer led by the Rev. J. E. Atwood.

Presbytery reconvened at 1:30 p.m. with the singing of a hymn and prayer.

The Rev. Vance Barron, pastor of the Chapel Hill Church, Orange Presbytery, spoke to the Presbytery regarding the need of help by the Chapel Hill Church in ministering to the Presbyterian students at Chapel Hill.

It was moved that the Council of Presbytery be asked to study the matter and report to Presbytery at the next meeting.

The report of the Committee on Church Extension was adopted, as read by the chairman, the Rev. R. K. Johnson, as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH EXTENSION

The following reports of the various sub-committees of the Executive Committee on Church Extension constitute the report of the larger committee to the Presbytery:

EVANGELISM

Your Committee on Evangelism wishes to submit the following report: This year of 1960 has been a memorable year for your committee, with the emphasis upon Evangelism throughout our church, leading up to

the Centennial Year of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. Your Chairman, Horace H. Hilton, Jr., along with eight other ministers from this Synod received special training at Union Theological Seminary on Person-to-Person Evangelism. There were twelve ministers of Wilmington Presbytery selected and these met for special study on Person-to-Person Evangelism. They were asked to go back to their churches and select twelve of their laymen, training them in Person-to-Person Evangelism. The projected goal is to have a trained group of laymen in Person-to-Person Evangelism in each local church.

The ministers and elders who were commissioners to the General Assembly, Jacksonville, Florida, also attended Pre-Assembly Conference on Evangelism.

Also, a large percentage of ministers and elders attended the Pre-Synod Conference on Evangelism at Greenville, North Carolina, this past summer.

The highlight of this year was the visit of the Cavalcade team to Wilmington for Wilmington Presbytery, October 3-4. Members of the Cavalcade team were:

Dr. Walter Courtenay, First Presbyterian Church, Nashville, Tennessee.

Dr. Randolph Taylor, Church of the Pilgrims, Washington, D. C.

Dr. Calvin Rose, Miami Shores Presbyterian Church, Miami, Fla.

The Cavalcade meetings were well attended. The first meeting met in the Chapel of First Church at 4:00 P.M., October 3. This meeting was composed of the committees of Evangelism in the local churches. Dr. Randolph Taylor spoke to the church leaders at 8:00 P.M. The large Mass Rally was held in the sanctuary of First Presbyterian Church, Dr. Walter Courtenay, the speaker. At 7:00 A.M. the ruling and teaching elders met for breakfast at St. Andrews-Covenant Presbyterian Church with Dr. Calvin Rose, the speaker. At 9 A.M. the ministers of Wilmington area met for some very challenging remarks from Dr. Courtenay. Mr. James Scott was the General Chairman of the Cavalcade. Presbyterians of Wilmington Presbytery were challenged to go forth the three remaining months of 1960 in preparing ourselves for entering into a time of renewal for our mission as a Church to the people of the Southland. As a Church we are to love, to serve, and to tell. It is our sincerest wish that our Presbytery will dedicate themselves to the task and challenge that is before us as we leave one century and enter another.

HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Committee works in the closest sort of cooperation with the Executive Secretary. During the year covered by this report, Dr. L. A. Taylor who had guided the work of Home Missions in this Presbytery for fifteen years, has retired, and we are beginning our happy cooperation with Mr. Tubbs his successor.

In the report of this Committee for the year 1959 we included a summary of the progress of Home Missions for the past ten years or more. This was prepared by Dr. Taylor and was printed in the Minutes of Presbytery covering the October meeting. (Pgs. 6-8).

The work of this committee is divided into several departments, but as the name indicates it deals entirely with aid to Churches which are not

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altogether self-supporting. Salaries must be supplemented, aid rendered in building of Churches, educational plants and manses, the repair and upkeep of the property belonging to the Presbytery, and in advice and help in the matter of securing pastors, on planning for new Churches in growing communities, and in encouraging Churches to assume an increasing portion of their support. Most of this actual work is done by the Executive Secretary, working with the Committee and with its advice and consent.

During the year now closing we have experienced a slightly more than average loss of ministers, and find several fields and Churches without the service of regularly installed pastors, but most of these are having Sunday services more or less regularly by visiting ministers and laymen.

PRESBYTERIAL COMMITTEE ON CHURCH EXTENSION

A letter was sent out in the early part of 1960 to seventy-four local chairmen, this letter informed them of the Calendar of Events for the year.

Church Extension as observed in May. The Rev. Denver S. Blevins filled five engagements as Home Mission speaker. Other churches were invited to participate in these meetings. I would like to quote the following statement which came in on a yearly report from a local Chairman of Church Extension. "Our speaker for Church Extension was the best in a long time—a real testimony of his acceptance of Christ and living for him. We know why he was included in *Living Epistles*, for he really was and is one." Local speakers were also used, as well as special film.

The offering from our District meetings was dedicated to be used for the Presbyterian Home in High Point. The amount was \$308.09. Eighty per cent of the Church Extension offering was kept in Wilmington Presbytery.

Seventy-four report blanks were sent out to the local Chairmen. Forty-four of these have been returned. The most outstanding work done this year is as follows:

1. Eleven Negro delegates were sent to Winston-Salem. Several Churches shared the expenses.
2. One delegate was sent to Stillman. Several churches sent their offering directly there.
3. Bible School was held by several of the Negro delegates. Church papers and Church Material was donated to the colored churches.
4. Participation in Evangelism was encouraging.

5. Practically all of the churches contributed to the Presbyterian Home and also Barium Springs.
6. I have attended two Home Mission meetings and one meeting of the Church Extension Committee of Wilmington Presbytery.

The Chairman would like to report to the Presbytery that they were represented through their chairman at the Church Extension Conference at Montreat in August and that the chairman had the privilege to serve on General Assemblies standing committee on Church Extension at the meeting of the General Assembly in Jacksonville, Florida in April.

Your Committee on Homes met at the First Presbyterian Church, Wilmington, N. C., on Monday afternoon, October 10th, there being present the Rev. C. H. McLean, Mrs. P. R. Smith and W. H. Henderson.

Reports for the year 1959 of the Presbyterian Orphans' Home, The Presbyterian Home, Inc. and William Black Home, Inc. to the Synod of North Carolina, June 14-15, 1960, meeting were reviewed.

1. The report of The Barium Springs Orphanage shows that that institution has been operating in the black but there is continued need for capital improvements. Your Committee recommends that all Churches in Wilmington Presbytery encourage members to contribute generously to the support of the Orphanage when the Thanksgiving Special Collection is taken.

2. The report of the Presbyterian Home, Inc. shows that when the campaign for \$750,000.00 was conducted, Wilmington Presbytery was asked for \$49,930.17, only Albemarle Presbytery being asked for a smaller amount, but that pledges from Wilmington Presbytery amounted to only 18.9% of our quota. This Home for the aged fills a very definite need and your Committee recommends that the churches of the Presbytery give consideration to increasing their contributions to this Home.

The report of the Permanent Committee on Christian Relations was read and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE PERMANENT COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN RELATIONS

The Committee on Christian Relations has had a full year of existence under the plan of reorganization. We are able to report some progress in the relieving of racial tensions within the Presbytery, specifically the solution of the lunch counter sit-ins in Wilmington and the inclusion of the Chestnut Street Presbyterian Church in the Wilmington Area Leadership Training School. These achievements do not constitute a cause for

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complacency but rather indicate the possibility of progress toward more Christian attitudes and relations. In addition to racial tensions we still are faced with the problems of obscene literature and entertainment, alcoholism and a continuing trend toward Juvenile delinquency. In at least one county in our Presbytery, church groups have cooperated with county authorities in an effort to stamp out the sale of salacious literature at news counters. Alcoholic education which has been vigorously promoted in some Presbyteries remains largely untouched by the Church in this area. Your Committee recommends that the possibility of an institute on alcoholism be explored with the purpose of setting up some such program as now exists in Greensboro, Charlotte and other cities within the State. Once more we urge that Church Sessions undertake serious studies of moral conditions in their vicinity and take the lead in the establishment of local councils of churches or other agencies of protestant community cooperation.

We call to the attention of the Presbytery that the mission of Christian action is an essential part of the Mission to the Nation which is planned for our centennial year and urge the earnest participation of every congregation in this essential phase of our evangelistic witness.

 - C. Authorize and empower the Trustees to execute legal instruments necessary for this transaction;
 - D. Designate the Rev. Mr. James B. Tubbs to act as the agent of the Presbytery and of the Camp and Conference Center Steering Committee in these matters.
2. Examine and receive the Rev. Mr. Robert S. Link from Charleston Presbytery, and, upon his enrollment, act upon his call by the Chadbourn and Pages Mill churches and appoint a Commission to install him as Pastor of said churches, if the way be clear;
3. And any business growing from these matters."

A Resolution was read by the Rev. Mr. Frank Elliott for the Steering Committee of the Camp and Conference Center, requesting the Presbytery to authorize and empower it, the Trustees, and designate Mr. Tubbs to act on behalf of Presby-

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tery pertaining to the items in the call. The Presbytery authorized the Steering Committee to negotiate a loan not in excess of \$90,000.00 thru the Trustees; authorized the Trustees to issue Promissory Note for the face value of the loan and a Deed of Trust on the property of the Camp and Conference Center, and, authorized the Trustees to execute legal instruments necessary for this transaction, and designated the Rev. Mr. James B. Tubbs to act as agent for the Presbytery and the Camp and Conference Center in these matters.

A Letter of Dismissal from Charleston Presbytery was read for the Rev. Mr. Robert S. Link, which was received by Presbytery, which proceeded with his examination.

Mr. Link was examined on Experimental Religion and his Motives for Seeking the Ministry by the Rev. Mr. W. H. Allison, which was sustained as satisfactory.

Mr. Link was examined on his views in Theology by the Rev. Mr. David B. Jenkins, which was sustained as satisfactory.

Mr. Link was examined on his views of the Sacraments and Church Government by the Rev. Mr. William P. Burns, Jr., which was sustained as satisfactory.

The Presbytery sustained the entire examination as a whole, as satisfactory, and the Rev. Mr. Link was enrolled as a member of Wilmington Presbytery upon his signing of the Obligations.

The Commission on Minister and His Work, through the Rev. Mr. Ira Rawles, Chairman, presented the call of the Chadbourn Presbyterian Church to Mr. Link, the essential elements of which are as follows: \$5,200.00 per year in regular monthly payments (which includes \$500.00 car expense allowance), a manse, a sum equivalent to 7½ % of the salary basis paid into the Ministers Annuity Fund, plus thirty days vacation at a time of his selection. The Call was found in order, with the exception of the matter of providing for Group Hospitalization Insurance, as required by Presbytery.

The Commission on Minister and His Work was directed to effect the matter of Mr. Link's relationship with the Pages Mill Presbyterian Church (which did not submit a Call to Mr. Link) and the matter of Group Hospitalization Insurance in the Chadbourn Call.

ANNUAL REPORT TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY OF ACTIVITIES AS A CHAPLAIN IN THE UNITED STATES NAVY FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 1960

During the year just past, 1960, some have sown, others have watered, and now for time and eternity it is in the hands of God to give the increase. A military chaplain, because of the frequency of change, has little opportunity to see the results or fruition of his work.

During the first half of 1960, this chaplain was at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot (Boot Camp) at Parris Island, South Carolina. There the young recruits came in great numbers; but then in twelve weeks they were gone again. A recruit battalion chaplain has tremendous opportunities for a short period of time with each man, in lecturing, counseling, and preaching. After graduation, however, for the most part these young men become "lost" to the chaplain in the anonymity of the distant and the unknown. But there are always a few who maintain a bit of contact.

However, I have been particularly fortunate in this regard, in that I received orders to be detached about 1 June and to report for duty with the Fleet Marine Force of the Third Marine Division on Okinawa. In this way I have been able to follow up and share in a new phase of the life and work of many of the young men with whom I was associated at Parris Island. It has been an interesting contrast, and something of a natural sequence. I have liked being a part of a field Marine unit, which my Third Battalion is. As an additional duty I am the Regimental Chaplain for the Ninth Marine Regiment, by which circumstance I have two jobs and are responsible to two commands.

However, all has not been sweetness and light. One's faith and temper is solely tried by the apparent widespread apathy by my constituency and throughout the Division in general toward things religious, and by the all too general compromise of Christian moral standards by the majority of young men like those for whom I had a spiritual responsibility at Parris Island. The higher echelons of command provide excellent leadership, support, encouragement, and example. But it appears in the lower elements of the rank structure that there is generally a tacit acceptance of lowered moral standards as being the norm.

The question arises whether religion and morality is thought by many to be a veneer and a covering which can be removed at will, as expedient; or is it the basic transformation of life in a new relationship and a new commitment which we proclaim it to be? There are certainly reasons and circumstances which help to explain the situation. But I have not come to feel that these are sufficient to justify or excuse the serious departure from manifest standard of moral behaviour.

A further significant question is, are these young men at all representative of American Christianity? I do not believe they are. But if so, it can only be concluded that the Church has been less successful than generally believed in bringing about the miracle of conversion to the people of our nation. There is serious evidence that moral standards are becoming progressively more relative, rather than being of an absolute nature. The "thus saith the Lord" has become qualified by the mind and conduct of many people, and by our society in general.

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As I write this report, we on this military bastion which is Okinawa stand ready to intervene as necessary in another Korea-type crisis. I pray that the holy God will bless our cause and use us for righteousness and his eternal purposes, although our hands are not clean and our hearts are far from pure. In any situation, however, there is always the faithful few. May God bless us for their sakes.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my deep appreciation once again for the great privilege of being a commissioner from Wilmington Presbytery to the meeting of the General Assembly in Jacksonville last Spring. Our confidence in our leaders, heritage, and Presbyterian system is well justified.

I pray for God's blessing, guidance, and power in the great work of the Church in the Presbytery, the Assembly, and throughout Christendom!

Subj.: Annual Chaplain's Report to Presbytery (1960)

This year, 1960, has been another tremendous experience in every way for me, as I have continued my ministry among the men in the military of our United States Navy and Marine Corps. As stated in my last year's report to you, after Chaplain's School in Newport, Rhode Island, I was assigned to the Second Infantry Training Regiment, Camp Pendleton, California, where until July of this past year I was the only full time chaplain for from 4 to 5,000 Marine trainees, aged from about 17 to 24 years. This continued to be until the time of my departure a tremendous challenge and opportunity. With the full cooperation of our whole regiment, many new activities were entered into, with what we felt were great effects on the men. Among those things begun were a Sunday School program, a religious movie hour on Sunday afternoons, religious instructions, a choir, a chapel beautification project, church trips into the metropolitan Los Angeles area. It is estimated that several thousand men took advantage of these opportunities over a period of months, and movies were taken of the work which are now being used in Baptist theological seminaries to describe the work of Chaplains in the military to their chaplain candidates. In addition, some 245 men made decisions for Christ directly or indirectly as a result of our trips and religious retreats. Thirty-two of these were baptised at 2nd ITR.

It is hard to state in short form exactly what the life of a Chaplain under such circumstances is like. I can only say truthfully that there could easily have been four chaplains working full time there without any trouble at all and still there would have been more work than we could have accomplished. So, we stuck to it, did the best we could, and I was a sad, but thankful chaplain when my orders came for a duty change to the

Destroyer Division #601 in Key West, Florida. I was sad because I would never forget the hundreds of men I had had the privilege of knowing and working with, but happy because God had further experiences and work lying ahead.

The scaling of hills on five day wars; the hauling coffee in a 1951 Chevy for our movie hour; the eleven o'clock nights driving home to fall in bed; the hundreds of faces, lectures, sermons, memorial services, staff conferences, hospital duties on the side at the main hospital at Camp Pendleton—all these are memories a chaplain can never set out of his mind or heart. The men who come with tears in their eyes, grasping for realities or their souls; distraught parents wishing to be appeased when their child and a young marine made some hasty action leading to near disaster; the drill sergeants reading scripture as well as barking drill instructions to the trainees—that is what it's like in a chaplain's memory. Fortunately I have taken pictures of all this work to show to those persons in the future who want to really know about religion in the service, and these have captured more than my meager words can relate.

I left Pendleton and went to Key West, Florida, to another very tremendous opportunity and challenge. There I inherited duties with the largest Destroyer Division of its type in the U. S. Navy. As the only "ship's afloat chaplain" in Key West, I became the sole chaplain for the 9 destroyers of #601 and some 3,000 dependents in the Key West area. In addition, as a member of the Commodore's Staff, many collateral duties came along with the work of the Chaplain. It was in Key West that I found again great challenge and meaning for Christian witnessing.

Some of the duties there include: coordinator of the 601 Softball League; representative of DesDiv 601 on 12 major board or organizations; services, lectures, coordinating safety and religious movies on the ships; chaplain for the local Sigsbee Park Elementary School P.T.A.; Chaplain and guard on the Key West Athletic Club football team (they finally let me play service ball); staff conferences with the Commodore every few days; preaching a half dozen times in the local Presbyterian Church; working with the civilian ministerial association; writing for the Key West paper and Naval Station paper; formulating a religious program for our ships, including securing of Catholic and Jewish padres for our men; riding the ships; working with the Wives' Club; attending ship's parties and arranging for fund-raising drives, etc. I was planning also to form a close association with the Presbytery down there, as I had the pleasure of knowing their moderator, Professor Hoy, of the University of Miami. He asked me to attend their Presbytery and give them a report of the work of the Chaplaincy and especially the work at Key West. Unfortunately I was called out on T.A.D. orders before this could be done. And, another grand experience—this time with destroyers there—was ended.

However, new horizons opened up, and one day the Force Chaplain called me on a Thursday afternoon late and asked if I could be ready to leave from Charleston, South Carolina, with the destroyers USS VOGELGESANG (DD-862) and the USS GEARING (DD-710) on a T.A.D. four to six months SouLantAmity people-to-people good will cruise to west Africa. It floored me, but somehow I got to Charleston, and now here I am with the "Cans" (destroyers) in our seventh port. It has been a fantastic cruise, and as the only chaplain aboard I have really had some terrific experiences.

Leaving Charleston 31 October 1960, we have been to: Trinidad; Brazil; Freetown, Sierra Leonc; Abidjan, Ivory Coast; Douala, French Camerouons; Dakar, Senegal; and now here in Conakry, Guinea. In every port I have met the local missionaries of all denominations and have seen first hand many of the ideas, problems, and spiritual thrusts of the Africans. Truly it is an amazing revelation. I certainly hope you will back world missions with all your hearts back there, because, now, as never before, Christianity is needed and also facing a great challenge on this continent. Truly, our missionaries and others, are doing a back-breaking job of grand work and they need your support and others to come!!

I felt at 2nd ITR that I had had about every possible experience but on board these "cans" I have again found amazing things and there is much to be done. God has been very good to us, and we have really gone out to the people over here, trying to help spread true Americanism in the face of other forces and movements. Some of the experiences can best be described as "hairy" since this is the first type cruise of its kind to this particular area in Naval history. We are in a sense forerunners for similar cruises to come. Included in the chaplain's activities with this cruise are the many duties of a chaplain, plus every other type of social event, entertainment, etc., possible. One occasion, for example, in Abidjan, I coordinated a group of four sailors, plus myself, in entertaining about 200 patients. We played musical instruments, and before it was all over, I had to teach about twenty of them to do the "mountain stomp." In turn I danced African dances with them, including the highlife. On another occasion, in Douala, I gave a speech in French to about 200 people—and French I haven't had since high school. They had a field day laughing at me, but we had a great time. Hundreds of African school children come aboard our ships to visit when we are in port. Athletic contests are held against local teams, and the fellows even have me catching on the softball team and playing also on the football team. This may sound far removed to many of you as work a chaplain should do, but believe me, a total ministry is called for among our men, and no area can be overlooked or avoided. I am very fortunate here, as in every command I have served with, in that the Commodore and Captains and officers and men have really given me tremendous support. So, because of their kindness I am trying to put them to work—singing in services, forming Carol teams, assisting in the services, entertaining missionaries and priests aboard, forming church parties to local churches, getting up Happy Hour entertainments for the fantail while at sea, etc. Our attendance has been very wonderful thus far, and we have built some benches to help with sitting. In every way, except uniquely so on this particular type cruise, this is a ministry for men at sea. Much counselling, morale factors, guidance "bull scessions," etc., are necessary. In a short while we will rendezvous with several other ships, and I will then ride the GEARING the rest of the cruise. It is then that other chaplains will join us, and I know they, too, will feel as fortunate to be along as I have felt.

My sole purpose in stating all these things is to cite to you what I feel to be one of the hardest, greatest, most rewarding areas of Christian service. When I was coming along, very little emphasis was placed on the Chaplaincy, but believe me, in this military age, it is a real mission field for men's souls. We need real emphasis in this area of our Church's work,

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and especially so on local levels. Our Chaplain's Department in Georgia is doing a fine job keeping us informed on various things, but honestly speaking, many of the chaplains with whom I have conversed, especially at General Assembly, have missed ties of a closer nature with home Presbyteries. We solicit your prayers and continued support, most especially in the realm of Presbytery events, news of the work of the Presbytery, etc. You are important to us, as we seek to represent our Presbytery and denomination in the military.

Listed now is a statistical analysis of the years' efforts. It is hoped that this report will meet with your approval and that you will continue to consider me as "one of you" out here. God bless each and every one of you, individually and collectively, and may you know that my prayers will always be for us all and the ONE whom we seek to love and serve.

The Rev. Reid H. Erwin presented the report of the Committee on World Missions. It was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF WORLD MISSIONS COMMITTEE TO WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY

January 17, 1961

In this day of violent nationalism, struggles for independence of non-whites against their white rulers, and echoing cries from many nations of "Yankee, Go Home!", there is perhaps a greater tendency to raise questions about our missionary responsibility than at any time in the recent past. The white man, and particularly the American, has suffered a tremendous loss of prestige in recent years, and we are led to believe that any efforts on our part will be resisted. Nevertheless, let us remember that the challenge does not come to us because we are white or American, but Christian; and no matter what may happen among the nations of men as they rise and fall, the unmistakable command of Christ recorded in Matthew and Acts to go forth and preach the Gospel is as valid and binding as ever before. No doubt many of the difficulties of the world today could have been averted had this command been more faithfully executed by his followers.

Recently there have been questions within our own denomination about the theological basis for missions, indicating that a certain element of doubt must exist even there, and this has prompted a special study by our Board of World Missions. Let it simply be said that if you can convince yourself that men are not really lost without Christ and that the other religions and isms of the world are as valid as Christianity for bringing man into right relationship with God, then perhaps you can say that the Congolese, the Japanese, or the Brazilian who does not know

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Jesus Christ as his saviour is not your responsibility. But if, on the other hand, you are convinced that Christ is the only way, and that men who do not know him are lost, then you have acknowledged that responsibility.

Perhaps one of the reasons that we are confronted with indecision in our thinking about world missions is because we have a tendency to assign it to a relatively minor place in the work of the church: one particular month, or worse than that, one particular week in the yearly program of the local church, and one brief report at the winter meeting of Presbytery. But let us not be mistaken! World missions is no supplementary activity carried on as a special project by the church, but a very important part without which the body of Christ is not complete. A church cannot rightfully consider that it has done its part by simply emphasizing world missions during the season set aside for that by the General Assembly and including it in the budget or taking a special offering. We need to keep it before us throughout the year as we do so many other parts of the church's work; and we must remember that it demands additional emphasis because the nature and results of the work are not as evident as that which is done within our own country.

Your committee would urge you to consider these matters carefully, and then to examine what is being done in your local church to promote an interest in World Missions. There is a great need for many things, particularly prayer, gifts, and the enlisting of candidates for missionary service. These things cannot be brought about without an adequate program of missionary education within the local church.

The committee is pleased to report that more than 15 adults and young people from this presbytery attended the World Missions Conference at Montreat last summer. Included in this number were your Presbytery chairman and the incoming Presbyterial chairman, Mrs. Mac Jones. It is hoped that even more will attend the 1961 conference.

The Board of World Missions has assigned three missionaries to itinerate in our presbytery in the coming month, Mr. and Mrs. William Worth and Rev. Joseph Woody. Mr. and Mrs. Worth will be here from January 29 to February 3 and will visit eight churches, and Mr. Woody will speak in ten churches between February 15 and 22. In some instances several congregations will meet together for a program, and in addition, several churches have made plans for the visit of a missionary independent of the committee.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH OF WILMINGTON PRESBYTERIAL, 1960

The Women of the Church have gone forward during our nine-month year in a wonderful way. They responded to the transition period beautifully and have already realized the many advantages of officers being elected in the spring before assuming office in October. It is hoped that many more will avail themselves of the opportunity for training at Synodical Training School.

The cost of Presbyterian Programs was \$33.60 for 600 copies.

The Every-member Bible study was held in practically all of the Churches with glowing accounts of the inspiration received. Many organizations reported weekly prayer groups.

The Women of the Church is composed of 75 organizations, 6 districts, 232 circles. We rejoice that we have one new organization, the Maple Hill Women of the Church.

District Conferences were held in five of the districts—one being canceled due to inclement weather. The 1960 conferences will long be remembered as "A White Conference." The theme was "Understanding the Bible." Inspiring messages were given by various ministers. The total attendance was 471. The offering amounted to \$308.09 and went to the Forward Fund of the Presbyterian Home.

Twenty-one representatives attended the Synodical Training school at Queen's College. Eight attended the Women's Conference at Montreat. Twenty Negro women were sent to the Interdenominational Christian Conference at Winston-Salem.

The Birthday offering amounted to \$2,074.12, a decrease over last year.

It is with deep gratitude that the young lady from our Presbytery who was the recipient of the Alice Johnson Scholarship Fund last year was again chosen this year. This Scholarship is given by the Synodical and is in memory of the late Mrs. Jackson Johnson of our Presbytery who was the first Synodical President. It goes to a worthy young girl in our Synod who wishes to attend the Presbyterian School of Christian Education, (formerly Assembly's Training School).

Our offering last year at District Conferences and Presbyterian plus a contribution from our surplus fund enabled us to increase our Wilmington Presbyterian Scholarship Fund \$700.00, making the accruing interest of \$135.00. It is hoped that the women will continue to take this as an objective and further increase the principal so that it will be of more substantial value to the recipient—Several churches have reported scholarships being given.

Our women are still praying diligently that choice young people will hear the call and surrender their lives to full-time Christian service. As evidence to answered prayer—one young lady has entered the Missionfield and is now serving in Brazil; six young people and ten adults attended the World Mission Conference in Montreat.

It is with regret that our Self-denial offering was less than last year. Surely our hearts were stirred as we remembered the less fortunate overseas by responding with 4,759 pounds of clothing. The amount of \$1,541.64 was contributed to World Missions—White Cross gifts were above quota and went to the Yodagawa Christian Hospital in Osaka, Japan.

Two Life Memberships were given.

Our women are showing a great interest in the Camp and Conference Center and will be given a tangible way to express their interest by their offering today.

Three Hundred and Ninety-nine women were reported helping in Daily Vacation Bible Schools. Several women served as counselors at the youth conferences.

Miss Ruth Hillhouse itinerated in our Presbytery conducting Officer's

Training Classes. She spoke to 382 women.

Two churches reported helping sending Negro students to Stillman College.

Substantial gifts were given to the Presbyterian Home, Barium Springs, Joy Gifts and Friends of the Seminary.

A great deal of interest was shown in Migrant work, especially in one area where several groups carried Health Kits to Migrant Workers. The Synodical urged that the women be urged to contribute through the United Church Women towards the purchasing of a Harvester (Mobile Unit).

Our contributions to the Winsborough Building in Montreat was gratefully received by the Board of Women's Work, and as your President attended the dedication service she was happy that the Women of the Church of Wilmington Presbytery had a part in the erection of this beautiful building.

While Bible study is a regular part of the program of the Women of the Church, it is my firm belief that this year's emphasis "Understanding the Bible" has helped women let Christ better become the Unifying Center of their lives. It is my prayer and fervent desire that they will continue to "search the Scriptures" that they may grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

F. The Executive Secretary reported to Council as follows:

The Executive Secretary has acted as Treasurer for over \$300,000.00 in some six different treasuries, and has given oversight in the keeping of these books.

In addition, your Executive Secretary has driven 8,900 miles, written 514 letters, paid out funds to accomplish all the work engaged in by committees and Commission of Presbytery; kept the minutes and issued the official documents as Stated Clerk; attended and participated in 26 Presbyterial meetings; 15 conferences with other groups and individuals, and attended eight other Presbyterian gatherings; preached 52 times in 20 churches, spoken or lectured in 10 more, and visited these and five more—a total of 35 churches out of the 82.

Among these preaching engagements were five revival services—totaling 32 sermons. The results of these have been 132 decisions for Christ—among them 27 professions of faith and 6 transfers by letter.

In addition, 21 students and one minister have been interviewed with view to taking pastorates within the Presbytery, and correspondence with 23 pastors concerning pastorates, conferring with 14 different pulpit committees for nominating pastors, working closely with the Commission on Minister and His Work.

Wallace—Salary \$4800, Manse utilities \$600.

Mt. Olive—add \$500 for utilities.

Presbytery docketed for the April meeting, the request of Harry B. Mitchell that he be divested of office without censure.

The Presbytery directed the Chadbourn Church to amend its call to read 7½ % of Salary for Minister's Annuity Fund and recommended that the item "pastors discretionary fund" be changed to "salary." Total Salary now reads: Salary \$4,900; car allowance \$840.

The Rev. H. E. Lewis presented his request to Presbytery that his pastoral relationship with the Faison and Calypso Churches be dissolved that he might accept the call of the Immanuel Church. Representatives of the church reported that the churches at duly called congregational meetings had concurred in the request. The request was granted.

The call of the Immanuel Church for the services of the Rev. Herbert T. Lewis was read, approved and ordered placed in his hands. He indicated his acceptance. The terms of the call were: Salary—\$4500 per annum; \$300—car allowance; \$75—book allowance; a month's vacation, manse and utilities, M.A.F. participation and Group Insurance.

The following commission was appointed to install Mr. Lewis as pastor of the Immanuel Church on January 22, 1961, 7:30 P.M.

1. Authorize and empower the Trustees of Presbytery to transfer the deed to the manse of Delgado Presbyterian Church from the Presbytery to the Trustees of the Delgado Presbyterian Church, and to issue all necessary legal documents to accomplish this act.

2. Authorize and empower the Trustees of Presbytery to transfer the deed to the manse of Carolina Beach Presbyterian Church from the Presbytery to the Trustees of the Carolina Beach Presbyterian Church, and to issue all necessary legal documents to accomplish this act.

3. Docket for April Stated Meeting: an amendment to the manual to include a Stewardship Committee;

4. Docket for April Stated Meeting the inclusion of the present Stewardship sub-committee chairman as a member of Council (in effect, setting aside the manual, pending Presbytery's action on re-establishment of a Stewardship Committee).

The report of the Standing Committee on Resolutions and Thanks, having been read at lunch was adopted as follows:
