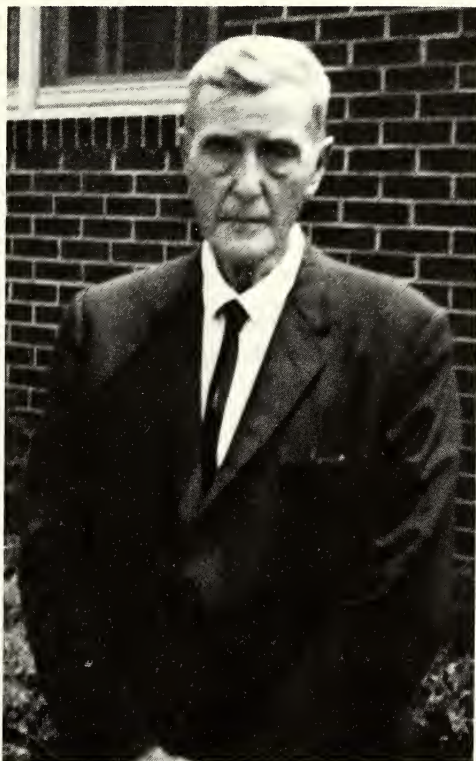

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# In Memoriam



Fred P. Jervis

September 26, 1898-July 14, 1971

The French Broad Association is privileged to dedicate the minutes of its 164th annual session to Fred P. Jervis, who efficiently served the association as Sunday school leader for twenty-one years and as clerk for sixteen years in addition to his other faithful services. Since 1941 he was a member of the Locust Grove Baptist Church, where he served as deacon, Sunday School leader, clerk, assistant treasurer, historian, and officer of the Baptist Training Union.

He was a worthy successor to his distinguished father, the late W. P. Jervis, for many years a teacher in Madison County, who at times served as president of Marshall College, as county superintendent of public schools, as publisher of the county newspaper, and as a leader in the association which he served with distinction as clerk, moderator, and historian. In 1880 he organized among the churches of the association the Sunday School Convention for the promotion of Bible Sunday schools and attended every meeting of the organization until 1925, the year of his death.

# Constitution

1970

## ARTICLE I - Name

The name of this body shall be the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association.

## ARTICLE II - Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be:

1. To coordinate and promote fellowship and growth, missions, Christian education, and involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors.
2. To cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in Kingdom advancement.
3. The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent and that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association.

## ARTICLE III - Membership

### SECTION I. Member Churches

1. This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist churches in this general area that have been formally accepted as members and who continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association; by sending messengers to the annual meetings; and by reporting to such annual meetings forms provided by the Association.
2. A church seeking admission to membership in the Association may make application in the following manner:
  - a. Decision to seek such admission shall have been determined by vote of the church in formal business session.
  - b. Copies of the Confession of Faith and the Covenant adopted by the church shall accompany the application.
  - c. Completed application shall be submitted to the Committee on Reception of New Members previous to the opening of an annual meeting of the Association.
3. The Committee on Reception of New Members shall report its findings to the Association on the first day of the annual session following its examination of any application. Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day, each church thus accepted will be enrolled as a member of the Association, and the moderator will extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers present.
4. Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another association or to remain unattached, it should proceed in the following manner:
  - a. Decision to withdraw shall have been determined in formal business session.
  - b. A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session should be submitted to the Moderator of the Association.
  - c. The Moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has towards the Association.

d. The committee shall report its findings to the Association in annual session and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. The Association in annual session by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or when the church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association.

#### ARTICLE IV - Officers

SECTION I. The Officers of the Association shall be:

1. Moderator, Vice moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of Missions (ex officio), Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, Director of Missions, and Director of Evangelism.

SECTION II. Election of Officers:

1. The Moderator, Vice moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be elected as follows: the incumbent Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee; this committee shall present a slate of names to which may be added nominations from the floor. Such nominations shall be voted upon during the first session of the annual meeting.

2. The Missions Committee shall recommend a Superintendent of Missions when there is a vacancy; election shall be by majority vote of the Association, and for an indefinite period.

3. The Associational Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood shall select directors for their respective organizations, and recommend these persons to the Nominating Committee to be presented with the other nominees proposed for election.

SECTION III. Terms of office shall be as follows:

1. All elected officers shall take office at the close of the last session of the annual associational meeting.

2. The duties of the Clerk serving during the current session are not ended, however, until the work of the session is completed and the minutes printed and distributed.

3. The Moderator may serve no more than four years consecutively.

4. All committee members appointed and elected in the annual session shall begin their work at the close of the annual meeting and continue through the next annual session of the Association.

#### ARTICLE V - Executive Committee

SECTION I. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers named in Article IV, and one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, with the Moderator as Chairman.

SECTION II. The Moderator, Vice moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by

The Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the Committee.

SECTION III. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

1. To act in behalf of the Association between annual meetings of the Association.
2. To carry out the plans laid at the annual session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the associational work.
3. No obligations to exceed \$500 may be undertaken by the Executive Committee on behalf of the Association, without specific authority from the Association.

#### ARTICLE VI - Missions Committee

SECTION I. The Missions Committee shall be composed of a Director and eleven additional members recommended by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association in annual meeting. All mission work sponsored by the Association shall be under the supervision and direction of the Missions Committee.

SECTION II. Duties of the Missions Committee:

1. This Committee shall, when a vacancy occurs in the office of Superintendent of Missions, recommend a successor based upon the approved job description, to the annual meeting, or to a special called meeting of the Association.
2. It shall work in cooperation with the Director of Missions of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.
3. It shall supervise the activities of, and work with, the Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association.
4. It shall meet quarterly receiving written monthly reports from the Superintendent of Missions and make suggestions to him concerning the work of the Association.
5. It shall advise any group seeking to organize a mission or church.
6. It shall assist, upon request, churches with particular problems.
7. It shall maintain awareness of the mission needs of the churches in the Association and be ready to recommend ways in which these needs may be met.
8. It shall prepare and present a budget to the annual meeting of the Association.

SECTION III. The Missions Committee shall recommend to the Association for approval a job description for the Superintendent of Missions, who will serve as ex officio member of all committees.

#### ARTICLE VII - Steering Committee

SECTION I. The Steering Committee shall be composed of the Vice Moderator as chairman, the pastors of the member churches, and two lay members elected by each church and named in the associational letter.

SECTION II. The responsibilities of the Steering Committee shall be:

1. To meet quarterly with the Executive Committee to consider the Kingdom work of the Association.
2. To assist in the promotion of the work of the Association in the churches.
3. To assist committee's reports in acquainting the churches with different phases of the work.

#### ARTICLE VIII - Other Committees

SECTION I. The following committees shall be composed of three or more members each. They shall be appointed by the Moderator and the Committee on Committees, at

the annual associational meeting, to serve in the ensuing year and for the next annual meeting.

**SECTION II. Duties of these committees shall be:**

1. **Committee on Committees:** to work with the Moderator in the annual session in the appointment of committees.

2. **Nominating Committee:** to nominate the associational officers and recommend to the Executive Committee replacements for vacancies occurring during the year. Nominations shall first have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.

3. **Committee on Reports:**

a. This committee shall inform our people about the work they have been chosen to represent and lead in promoting it.

b. They shall make brief written reports to the annual associational meeting.

c. This committee consists of a member for each of the following phases of work: Evangelism, Cooperative Program, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

4. **Program Committee:**

a. This committee shall prepare a printed program for the annual associational meeting, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors.

b. This committee shall, in the opening meeting, present the printed program for adoption with necessary adjustments.

5. **Committee on Places and Preachers:**

a. This committee shall recommend the time and place or places for the next annual associational meeting.

b. This committee shall recommend the preachers and alternates for the Associational Sermon and the Missionary Sermon.

6. **Constitutional Amendment Committee:**

a. This committee shall consider and recommend changes in this Constitution which have been referred to them in the regular annual meeting.

b. This committee shall recommend changes in this Constitution that become necessary for clarity and for the proper functioning of the associational work.

7. **Committee on Resolutions:**

a. This committee shall consider and present to the annual associational meeting any resolutions referred to them.

b. They shall prepare and present any further resolutions deemed expedient to them.

8. **Youth Committee:**

a. This committee shall work with, in advisory capacity, the youth of the Association.

b. They shall promote programs that are of interest to the youth, such as music festivals, camps, retreats, study courses, fellowships, and the like.

9. **Ordination Committee:**

a. When so requested by a member church, they shall examine any candidate for the gospel ministry, in matters of life, doctrine, personal faith, cooperation, and any others relating to the ministerial call.

b. Upon approval, they shall recommend the ordination of this candidate.

10. **Seminary Extension Committee:** they shall promote and direct the Seminary

ension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director and Registrar annually. They shall appoint teachers in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for classes in this program.

#### ARTICLE IX - Annual Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be on Thursday and Friday following the first Sunday in August.

#### ARTICLE X - Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting on the first day, and by a majority vote of messengers present and voting the second day.

#### ARTICLE XI - Parliamentary Authority

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned.

## Proceedings

Reverend W.L. Lynch, Moderator called the 164th annual session of the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association of North Carolina to order at 7:30 P.M. on Thursday evening August 5, 1971 at the Mars Hill, Baptist Church.

Mrs. Dorothy Roberts, Associational music director conducted a program of music with the congregation singing: "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," "I am Thine O Lord," and "Jesus Saves."

Everyone received a warm welcome from Vernon Wood, who welcomed all and gave the devotional. He used as his thought "What Baptist have striven to achieve. His scripture reading was taken from John 2:24-John 3:3.

Mr. Lynch welcomed the delegates and Mr. Joe Morgan made the motion that the messengers be constituted. Mr. Price, pastor of the Mars Hill Church moved the adoption of the program, modifying it when necessary.

W.L. Lynch spoke concerning the work of the Executive Committee then moved the adoption of the Executive Committee report. Report adopted. (L)

Mr. Perry Willis moved the adoption of the World Missions report. The report was adopted. See report 2.

Mrs. C.R. Cohn moved the adoption of the Cooperative program report as printed in the book of reports. Report adopted. Report 3.

Vance Edwards, Associational treasurer gave the treasurers report. He reported more churches gave to the Associational missions program than in previous years. Report no. 4 was adopted.

A roll call of the churches was made by the clerk, Mrs. Charlie Clayton, 30 churches were represented with 112 messengers present and 12 alternates and 38 visitors.

E.J. Jenkins, Superintendent of missions, recognized the new pastors in our association. Rev. Gene Hall was recognized as pastor of the Madison Seminary Baptist

church. Rev. Hall is welcomed into our association.

Miss Sue Fitzgerald, chairman of the nominating committee moved the nomination of the executive, missions, and other necessary committees. These were approved.

Rev. Worth Emory, chairman of the Constitution Amendment committee called attention to the recommended changes for the Constitution. Dr. Bentley questioned the committee on their plans to enlarge the executive committee. He felt it would be hard to have a quorum with such a large body. He moved the present plan of the executive committee be retained. Motion carried. Since the steering committee had not been included in the revisions, Rev. Holt made the motion that the steering committee be continued. The function and necessity of the steering committee was questioned. It was explained the steering committee is a communicating body between the executive committee and the local church. The motion passed that the steering committee be continued. Rev. Price moved the elimination of the cabinet as suggested in the revisions. (See report no. 6 and Constitution). Other amendments were accepted.

A motion was made by Joe Morgan that the Associational Minutes for the year be dedicated to Fred Jarvis, deceased. Mr. Jarvis had been a faithful worker in the Association for many years until his death.

The report of the Ordination council was given. One correction was made. Two ministers were ordained. They were Rev. John Bussard, Forks of Ivy and Rev. Lan Brown, Laurel Valley. After the correction the report was adopted. Report no. 7.

The Mars Hill Baptist Church choir presented special music using the anthem "Praise My Soul, The King of Heaven" by Andrews. Following the music the evening sermon was brought by Rev. Richard Price. He used as his text "The Unity God Will for us."

The first session of the annual meeting was closed by prayer.

The second session of the one hundred sixty fourth annual meeting of the French Broad Baptist Association of North Carolina was called to order at 9:30 A.M., Friday morning, August 6, 1971, by W.L. Lynch at the Piney Mountain Baptist Church.

Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the congregation in singing a hymn of praise, "Holy, Holy, Holy." Rev. Worth Emory conducted the devotions reading from the Psalms.

Following the devotions Lester Murphy gave the Sunday School report. Report adopted. No. 8.

Rev. Arthur Ammons, in the absence of Truman Fisher moved the adoption of the Church Training report. Mr. Jenkins spoke to the report, urging churches to a greater effort in Church training. Report adopted. No. 9.

The Brotherhood report was adopted. Report 10. Mr. Hogan spoke to the report encouraging to a greater work in our churches. A men's retreat was held at Mars Hill College and those taking part were spiritually enriched as they worshiped together and with other churches.

The W.M.U. Report was adopted. Report 11.

Mrs. Roberts moved the adoption of the music report. Report adopted. No. 12.

The V.B.S. report was adopted. Mr. Jenkins spoke to the report. He said there had been an increase in the Cooperative Program Offerings and in Bible School attendance. Since many churches added an adult class greater interest has been shown. See report no. 13.

Rev. Keller requested the Evangelism report be given at this time. He announced the evangelistic crusade and spoke concerning its importance. Report adopted. No. 14.

Mr. Ray Buckner moved the adoption of the Baptist Periodicals report. Mr. Marston Grant, editor of the Recorder spoke to the report. Report adopted. No. 15

Miss Sue Fitzgerald gave the Christian education report, Report adopted, No. 16.  
Rev. Robert Holt gave the Seminary extension report. Following this he urged all to  
take advantage of the extension classes, Report adopted, No. 17.

Following a hymn, "Footsteps of Jesus," Mr. Lynch expressed our appreciation

The steering committee was adopted, Mr. Arthur Ammons spoke to the report, No.

1. Miss Sadie Wallin gave the resolutions committee report, It was adopted, No. 22.  
Mr. Lynch recognized our Superintendent of Missions, E.J. Jenkins who read a  
letter from Mr. John McGee expressing his thanks for the 2000 Bibles sent to Nigeria.  
Mr. Lynch also expressed our appreciation to Mr. Jenkins and his staff and Miss Gaye  
Jenkins typist, for the Book of Reports.

Huey spoke about plans for a home for the Superintendent of missions. A possible  
site has been found.

Mr. McLeod gave the Historians report, Report adopted, No. 29.

Mrs. L.L. Vann moved the adoption of the civic righteousness report. She spoke  
to the report, Report adopted. See No. 30.

The American Bible Society Report was adopted, No. 31.

The report of the committee on reports was adopted, No. 32.

Mr. Roy Snyder gave the report on place and preacher, Adopted, No. 33.

Mr. Ammons explained it was time for the second vote on the proposed revisions  
to the constitution, Dr. Bentley moved the deletion of "Southern Baptist Convention"  
in Article III, section 5, Motion passed, A second vote on all other revisions approved  
the amendments to the constitution.

Mr. Robert Smith, architect, from the state Department of Architecture was recog-  
nized.

Mr. Jenkins announced a World Missions conference will come to our association  
in 1973.

The messengers stood in memory of those who have departed this life during the year.

The one hundred and sixty fourth annual meeting of the French Broad Baptist Association was concluded by prayer.

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee met in regularly scheduled sessions on August 2, October 11, and November 8, 1970, and on February 14, March 14, May 2, and June 13, 1971, and in called meetings on December 17, 1970, May 12, and July 10, 1971. Four of these meetings were joint meetings with the Steering Committee. It tried to fulfill its constitutional duties: "To act in behalf of the Association between annual meetings, to carry out the plans laid at the annual session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the association work."

At the August meeting the report of the Committee on Committees was adopted and the committees appointed as published in the 1970 Minutes of the Association. The bid of the Southern Baptist Press for printing the Minutes was accepted and the contract signed.

Other business transacted in subsequent meetings included the following items. The resignation of the Rev. A.A. Peverall was accepted for his committee assignments when he moved from the pastorate at Marshall and entered a new work in Virginia. The Rev. Roy Keller was elected Director of Evangelism, the Rev. Worth Emmons was named Chairman of the Constitutional Amendment Committee, and the Rev. Orlando Hawkins was elected to fill the vacancy on the Ordination Council.

At the October joint meeting with the Steering Committee the Executive Committee approved a three-months trial of accepting the sponsorship of a commercial concert for a daily thirty-minute gospel broadcast over Radio Station WMMH. The arrangement was renewed in February for another three months. Since it is doubtful that this action was "in line with the general policies and practices of the associational work," accepting commercial sponsorship was probably out of order.

Kenneth Buckner, Sunday School Director, resigned on account of a health problem and the Rev. Lester Murphy was elected to serve out his unexpired term. The Rev. Ralph Hogan and Mrs. Cory Wallin were appointed to plan the program for the annual Christmas dinner for the Executive Committee and the pastors. The Clerk, Mrs. Charles Clayton, was asked to write the churches of their opportunity to make a love gift at Christmas to Superintendent of Missions and Mrs. Jenkins, and the check was presented to them at the dinner.

The Association had approved the Spillcorn summer ministry and an Association Camp. The Committee implemented these actions by securing Miss Nancy Knight to return to Spillcorn for a second summer, and the date of the Camp was set for the week of June 21-26 and named the Rev. Ralph Hogan as Camp Director. The committee passed a resolution limiting our summer mission ministries to the boundaries of the Association.

A resolution was passed in the February meeting requesting our representative in the legislature to vote against liberalizing the liquor laws affecting our area. Copies of the resolution were forwarded to the Hon. Liston Ramsey and the Hon. Ernest Messer to the News-Record, and to the Biblical Recorder.

A communication was received from the Pleasant Valley Baptist Church that they had voted to withdraw from our Association. A committee consisting of the Rev. E.J. Jenkins, Wade Huey, and Vance Edwards was appointed to try to confer with this church and to urge them to reconsider and remain in the Association.

The committee gave its approval to plans of the Evangelism Committee to hold simultaneous revivals at three centers in the Association in September, 1971. Approval was given for scheduling simultaneous Schools of Missions in the local churches in a future year when arrangements can be made with the mission boards.

A committee was named to investigate the securing of land and building an associational pastorium for the present and future Superintendents of Missions. Wade Huey is chairman and Rex Allen and Vance Edwards are the other members. Some thought has been given to a combination campground and pastorium site.

The relationship of the churches of our Association and Mars Hill College was discussed in meetings of the committee and a College Relations Committee was named. The Rev. Gordon Ball, Wade Huey, and Coy Roberts were named on the committee to confer with the administrative officers of the college about these concerns.

A letter was written to the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the college on May 5 spelling out these concerns centering in the religious atmosphere of the campus at a low ebb, poor taste in the 1970 and the 1971 editions of the college yearbook, the apparent relaxation of rules about the use of alcoholic beverages on the campus, objectionable open petting on the campus, apparent lack of supervision in dormitory life especially at times of interdormitory visitation. The churches not only are withholding offerings to Christian Education, but the Cooperative Program is being hindered. The trustees gave a hearing to representatives from the Executive Committee, and promised a report of their actions which has not been received.

At the request of the Nominating Committee of the Baptist State Convention four names were submitted from which the French Broad Association member of the General Board will be chosen. Two ministers and two laymen were suggested to them.

This has been a year of many activities on the part of the Executive Committee and other committees. The main implementation of this planning has been done through the efforts of our energetic and enthusiastic Superintendent of Missions, the Rev. E.J. Jenkins.

## WORLD MISSION REPORT

The total world mission program is the Cooperative Program. It is the channel through which North Carolina Baptists support the World Ministry, committed to them by Christ. Our service through the Cooperative Program makes possible Foreign, Home, and State Missions.

### STATE MISSIONS

If we think of missions as an extension of the ministry of the local church into organized channels of service, all we can do as a convention could be classified as Missions. But for the sake of sharing responsibility, we are organized into seven divisions. One of these seven is the DIVISION OF MISSIONS. The Division of Missions works through five departments, and numerous specialized ministries. These departments are: Town and Country and Seminary Extension; City and Metropolitan; Intersocial;

Deafwork; and Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute and Camp. For detailed information on any of the work of the Division of Missions, please contact the Divisional office, 301 Hillsborough St., Raleigh, N.C. 27603.

## HOME MISSIONS

An extensive restructuring of the staff of the Home Missions Board climaxed the year 1970. The plan is to strengthen and expand the Board's efforts to assist churches in Missions and evangelism. Missionaries number 2,222.

A training plan was put into operation for lay evangelism, including materials, spiritual preparation, and training which prepares laymen in sharing their faith, 94 chaplains serve. Church loans were made for 126 churches, about 350 new churches and church-type missions were established in 1970. Language missions for Southern Baptist included 1,032 missionaries in forty-one states, the District of Columbia, Cuba, Panama, and Puerto Rico.

Other mission programs such as Community Ministries, Interfaith Witness, Summer Missions, Distribution of Scriptures, and Motion Pictures were successful.

The Home Mission Board gave increasing attention to its efforts to assist the churches in carrying out its objective of winning our people for Christ.

The board will give a major emphasis to a full commitment by every Southern Baptist in Missions and evangelism.

## FOREIGN MISSIONS

The sending out and maintaining of missionaries are primary in Southern Baptist overseas through the channel of the Foreign Mission Board. At the close of 1970 the Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,501. This included 165 missionary associates, 4 special project medical personnel and 121 Missionary Journeymen. Appointments during the year totaled 182. Between January and May, 1971, 35 more were added.

Hundreds of calls for reinforcements in personnel have come from missions and national conventions in dozens of countries. Some requests, repeated from previous years and still urgent, are yet unfilled.

Underlying all our missionary endeavors is the ultimate purpose of leading people to new life in Jesus Christ and the cultivation of New Testament churches. Organized churches with which Southern Baptist missionaries are related on mission fields number total 5,853 of which 75% are self-supporting. Work and accomplishments reported are largely those of national churches, leaders, and conventions, with the assistance of missionary co-workers and resources from Southern Baptists.

The training of national leaders is a prerequisite to strong indigenous churches. Educational institutions under Baptists auspices in various lands that may include all levels from kindergarten through university. Of special importance is the development of pastors and other church leaders through theological schools and in programs below the full seminary level.

Publication ministries are an integral part of Southern Baptist overseas missions as all kinds of Christian literature are provided for purposes of evangelism and the developing of vigorous church life. Our missionaries are related to publishing centers in 24 lands and to inform literature production programs in a number of other countries. They assisted in producing over 27 million pieces of literature: tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, hymnals, and other items.

The program of hospitals and medical care serves the physical needs of thousands of people who would otherwise be neglected and often opens strategic doors for evangelistic witness. During 1970, missionaries and national workers engaged in this ministry treated more than 51,000 in-patients and saw nearly 930,000 out-patients. Benevolent ministries include agricultural programs, good will and community centers, children's homes, and direct relief work. During 1970, the Foreign Mission Board provided funds for emergency and recurring relief in several countries. Assistance was continued for Nigeria, to relieve the suffering and the severe malnutrition problem caused by the recent war there. Vietnam was another area with continuing pressing needs for direct relief.

At the end of 1970 Southern Baptist contributions for foreign missions totaled \$1,503,218. The 1970 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering had reached a total of \$16,220, 65 by May 1, 1971.

Approximately 50% of the Southern Baptist Convention Cooperative Program funds are made available annually for foreign missions. This is the basis upon which sustained advance can be built. Still needed urgently on overseas fields are land, buildings, and equipment, amounting to several million dollars' worth.

Those churches in our association who have had a part in this world missions work are to be commended for what they have done. But with all the accomplishments we will hear the Master speak to us in John 4:35 saying: "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest."

## CONSTITUTION AMENDMENT REPORT

1971

Article II. - Purpose, 1(d) CHANGE "Such forms of Social Service as the body may engage in" to (d) "Involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors." CHANGE 3 "All churches constituting the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies and voluntarily cooperate through the Association in order that they may more effectively promote the cause of Christ. The Association may advise and assist when called upon to do so." Change to read: 3. "The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association."

Article III - Membership, revise 3. (Second sentence) "Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority on the second . . ." Change to read: 3 (second sentence) "Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day . . ."

4. "Any member church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure." Revise to: 4. "Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another association or to remain from the Association unattached, it should proceed in the following manner: (a) Decision to withdraw shall have been determined by vote

the church in a formal business session. (b) A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session should be submitted to the Moderator of the Association. (c) The moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has toward the Association. (d) The committee shall report its findings to the Association, and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. "The Association with two-thirds majority of delegates voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon recommendations of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased observing the principles and policies customary to Southern Baptist Churches; or, when such church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years." Revise to read: "The Association by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or to have ceased observing the distinctive principles and policies characteristic of other churches cooperating with the Southern Baptist Convention; or when such church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative in helping the church with its report, and shall make every effort to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association."

Article IV. Officers. Delete the numbers 1-12 in this paragraph (section 1) and revise it to read: 1. "Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of Mission (ex officio), Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Women's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, Director of Missions and Director of Evangelism."

Renumber the paragraphs following: 1 to 2, 2 to 3, 3 to 4. Section III. Terms of Office... Add a new 4. to read as follows: 4. "All committee members appointed and elected in the annual session shall begin their functioning at the close of the annual meeting and continue through the next annual session of the Association."

Article V. Executive Committee (reads now) Section 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Moderator, who shall be the chairman of the committee, the Vice Moderator; the Clerk; Treasurer, Sunday School Director; Training union Director; Director of W.M.U., Brotherhood Director; the Director of Church Music; Director of Missions; Director of Evangelism; and in addition, one pastor, and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator." Revise to read: Section 1. "The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Association listed in Article IV with the Moderator as Chairman and the Clerk as Recording Secretary, plus the pastors and two lay members from each of the member churches named in the annual letter to the Association."

Section II. The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by the Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the committee."

REVISE by ending the sentence after the phrase, "at the time of election," and deleting the last part of the sentence beginning "the pastor and two lay member..."

Article VI. The Cabinet (A new section, then renumber present VI to VII and delete the present VII in its entirety). The Cabinet shall consist of the elected Officers of the Association listed in Article IV, with the Moderator as Chairman and the Clerk as Recording Secretary; and, in addition one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator for a one year term. These appointed members shall be from the Executive Committee and from three churches not already represented on the Cabinet at the time of appointment.

Article VIII - Special Committees: Change to: Article VIII Other Committees, (Omit "Section I,") since there is no Section II) Expand 10 of Article VIII to read: 10, Seminary Extension Committee:

They shall promote and direct the Seminary Extension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director and Registrar annually. They shall appoint teachers in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for the classes in this program."

Article X. - Amendment: Change to read: Article X. Amendments "This constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting on the second day."

Article IX. Annual Meetings. Omit "Section I" since there is no section I  
XI Parliamentary Authority (A new Article)

XI Parliamentary Authority: The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in the most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned,"

## WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

Training was received by all of the associational officers at Camp Mundo Vista early in September in preparation for the Leadership Conference which was held at the Mars Hill Baptist Church on September 29. On October 27, the manuals for each organization were taught by each associational director.

Living the Spirit of Christian "Openness and Freedom" was the theme of our annual meeting on May 18 at Long Branch Church. We were welcomed by the WMU President, Mrs. Frances Buckner, and the pastor, Rev. Author Ammons, led our opening devotion. Girls in Action from several churches served as pages. Mrs. Claxton Collier was elected chairman of the nominating committee for the coming year. The associational officers of the different age level organizations emphasized organizational changes, new terminology, and new materials. A very informative missionary sermon was brought by Rev. Troy Bennett, Missionary to Pakistan.

Mrs. Ralph Hogan, our associational support chairman, had a meaningful Prayer Retreat at Marshall Baptist Church on April 1. Mrs. Charlie Clayton, our associational study chairman, worked faithfully to engage all our churches in both Foreign and Home Mission emphasis. Contact her now concerning a churchwide study for each of them for the coming year. Mrs. E.J. Jenkins, our associational Missions Action chairman, did an excellent job obtaining money for Bibles for Nigeria.

Mrs. Amel Fisher has done an outstanding work with our Sunbeams for the past several years. This year she made a smooth change over to Mission Friends. Mrs. Kyle Jamerson, our Girls in Action director, had a fashion show at Forks of Ivy Church on January 30 to acquaint the girls in the association with the new materials. On April 23-24 she had an associational houseparty, and on July 16, a Day Camp at Trinity Church. Mrs. Thomas Ray, our associational Acteens director, had a covered dish supper at Oak Grove Baptist Church on December 5, 1970, after which a film on drugs was shown. On May 21 and 22, she had a houseparty at Ivy Hill Baptist Church.

The Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions was \$3,828.06. This was an increase of \$919.27 over last year's amount. The Lottie Moon Offering for Foreign Missions was \$9,049.85. This was an increase of \$912.30. Six of our societies gave one dollar per WMU member to Heck Jones Offering - Operation Payoff. These were Calvary, Beech Glen, Mars Hill, Piney Mountain, Bull Creek, and Gabriel's Creek. Long Branch gave one dollar per WMU member. As usual, we sent \$1,000 toward the support of Charles Buckner, our missionary in Indonesia. We gave our Superintendent of Missions, Rev. E.J. Jenkins, \$75 for daily Vacation Bible School material.

## EVANGELISTIC COMMITTEE REPORT

First, a word on our state-wide and the entire Southern Baptist emphasis on evangelistic efforts. Recognizing the need for lay people to become more involved in personal witnessing, our Southern Baptist Department of Evangelism in cooperation with State Secretaries of Evangelism has developed aids for the layman's use. These are called WIN materials. These will be taught through one week Lay Evangelism Schools on the Associational level. Each association must decide it wants such a school and then in cooperation with our State Department of Evangelism, plan the school.

Regarding our own evangelistic efforts, we report: During the joint meeting of the Steering Committee and the Executive Committee on January 3, 1971, it was voted to implement the suggestion of Rev. Arther Ammons in the November meeting that the French Broad Association sponsor a Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade in two churches with local pastors doing the preaching. The Evangelism Committee recommended that three divisions be made of the Association and that the Crusade be held in May. This was approved by both the Steering and Executive Committees. The Evangelism Committee set the date of May 2-8 for the Crusade. It soon became quite evident that shortage of time for promotion of the Crusade plus the possibility of conflict with spring revivals in the local churches called for a change of date. On March 14, the Executive Committee approved the suggested date of September 12-18.

A letter was sent to all pastors and Sunday School Directors containing a summary of plans. They were urged to lead their churches to cooperate and to report by July 15, (earlier if possible) if they would cooperate. To date, July 15, only 9 churches have voted to participate.

We trust that the Simultaneous Crusade may be a success. However, this can only happen as pastors and churches cooperate.

Perhaps this is one reason the paper continues to reach more and more people - it stands for something.

## CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

Through the years North Carolina Baptists have established seven communities of learning that are located in various sections of the state from the east side to the west. Why did we bother to begin communities of learning? In the case of some schools the answer is rather simple. There were no public schools and Baptists felt that Christians should grow in mind as well as in spirit. Baptists felt that Christians should continue to stretch their thinking in order to develop strong Christian leaders, to develop strong Christian laymen. But now there are public schools and the Baptist academies of western North Carolina are all closed. No longer are they needed. Yet we have continued to maintain communities of higher education. Why? We feel that Christian higher education is important. In a statement of aims and objectives written by the Council of Christian Higher Education of North Carolina we read: "The Christian college finds its theological basis in its commitment as a community of faith and learning." This commitment is founded upon a basic conviction about God, about man and about the world in which man lives. You can see that our communities of learning differ from state schools because we start with the solid foundation: all truth is of God. Truth in any area never stands alone, but is related to God and "ever has the power to reveal the dynamic and creative grace of God." Each college states its own purposes within this framework.

We have developed communities of faith and learning, and yet we often look at these communities of Christian higher education and feel they are unrelated to life, apart from us, which a student goes to for four years and then leaves without feeling he is a part of us or that we are a part of him. Some of the colleges have realized that students can learn as they serve. I talked to the chaplain here at Mars Hill to find out how many students on campus reach out to serve others through the religious programs. There are over 235 involved in off-campus ministries: B.S.U. revival teams,

Fellowship of Christian Athletes revival teams, services at Western Carolina sanatorium, Oteen, Juvenile Evaluation Center and others. He told me this number did not include those who serve in churches each Sunday in a paid capacity. There are approximately 100 in this area.

It is easy to see that students grow as they serve, and that in this way the college is seeking to serve us. But does this community of higher learning touch us in any other way. As I asked this question on our campus I was surprised to find how many ways they seek to reach out to the larger community. This year 329 persons were affected in some way through programs of the college community: tutors, Christian Ethics Institute, Career Opportunity Program, internships, Upward Bound students and the volunteer Corps. In some ways this Christian community seeks to reach outside its own walls.

What is our part in this Christian community of higher learning. First is the obvious one which is mentioned more than any other way - support through our money. I hesitate to talk about our support through money, for it bothers my conscience. Let's take the school nearest us. Last year the budget at Mars Hill College was over three million dollars. Do you know how much our Association gave to this college through the Cooperative Program? A little over \$600,00! Financially we can do better.

Another way we can be a part of our communities of learning is through prayer and Christian witness to students with whom we come in contact. Both of these are vital. And no longer can we say we do not see them.

But I see another way in which we have a strong and vital part in our colleges. The Christian community of higher learning is linked to two other Christian communities. The first one is obvious - the Church. President Poston of Gardner-Webb said at the Pastors' Conference: If you want strong Baptist colleges, send us strong Baptists. The college does not get the student until he is 18. We in the home church have him until he is 18. We must ask ourselves: how strong is our own Christian Education program? The second link is to the basic Christian community - the family. It is up to us to build strong Christian homes that give the foundation for all Christian growth. Each of these three Christian communities: family, church, college, will grow as we seek to strengthen the Christian community of higher learning in these varied ways.

## BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

The child care and family service ministry of North Carolina Baptists in Western North Carolina has undergone many new and wonderful experiences during the past year. Since the association last met, our program of service has been strengthened in various ways.

The desire for a Home to serve Western North Carolina has become a reality. In early May, after many years of careful planning, diligent work and generous giving by many friends of the Homes, the first two cottages for children on the Broyhill Home campus were opened. These were filled to a capacity by the early part of the summer making provisions for twenty-five additional children in group care.

In October of 1970, a new service was begun with the opening of a maternity home in Asheville. The girls who have been served in this program have responded well to the love, concern and care which has been provided them. This facility was made possible largely by our Baptist people and other friends in Asheville and Buncombe County.

With the provision of more adequate services for children and members of their families in Western North Carolina, it has been necessary to increase the size of staff to serve the area. Under the capable leadership of Hugh Starnes, Superintendent of Broyhill Home and administrator in Western North Carolina, members of the staff are seeking diligently to serve the many requests that are being made.

The expansion service and the improved quality of work being done requires addi-

tional financial support. Increased giving through the Cooperative Program the Thanks giving Offering, Special gifts by individuals, families, businesses and industries is necessary to provide quality services for those who turn to us for help.

Members of the Board of Trustees and members of the staff of the Baptist Children's Home use this opportunity of expressing genuine appreciation for your confidence and support. At this same time, they are seeking diligently to maintain the best program of child care possible.

## NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

Our North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging celebrated their 20th anniversary in March of this year. During these two decades, the story of our Homes has been one of faith and the abundant blessings of God upon this special ministry to older people. God has brought us from one Home, and one resident in 1951, to five Homes and a Nursing Care Unit, with total accommodations for 160 residents and 76 patients. Two of these Homes, Resthaven and the Hayes Home, and the Nursing Care Unit are located in Winston-Salem, and the other three Homes are located in Albemarle, Hamlet, and Yanceyville. In these Homes, our residents are loved, and we feel that there is no greater security that they could have and no better care that they could receive.

The past year has been one of the best ever, and we are rejoicing in the blessings that have come from God through our Baptist people. Support for the Homes from the churches, through the Cooperative Program and the Special Day Offering, has been most encouraging. For the last three years, the Homes have had an alarming deficit and have operated in the red. We have not yet reached the point of operating in the black, but let us say, with hopeful optimism, that we are approaching this time. The deepened concern of our Baptist People and the increase in gifts have been strong contributing factors to the success of the past year.

At least 80% of the people who live in our Baptist Homes are financially needy persons and benefit directly from the love gifts of North Carolina Baptists. They simply could not be maintained, and the Homes could not be operated without the Special Offering, designated gifts from the churches, and the Cooperative Program. We urge our Baptist people, therefore, to remember how dependent these dear older people are on them and would challenge them to give more liberally than ever and to see that their gifts are a real life-line in the on-going of this ministry.

Of unusual interest during the past year has been the construction of the new addition to the Nursing Care Unit in Winston-Salem. It is anticipated that this new facility will be ready for occupancy by September 1. It will make available 20 additional beds and bring the total capacity of the Nursing Care Unit to 76. This addition was made possible by the generous challenge gift of \$80,000.00 from Judge and Mrs. William York, of Greensboro. The trustees accepted the challenge and raised an additional \$80,000.00.

Pray for your Baptist Homes for the Aging and remember that any ministry to an older person in the name of Christ is a direct ministry to Him.

## BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Your Baptist Hospital admitted 17,577 persons in 1970 for a total of 150,174 days of care. In addition, there were 51,563 visits to outpatients clinics, including 17,241 to the Emergency Room. About 90% of these were "referral" patients - that is, patients who were referred to our Hospital by their local physicians because they needed the specialized medical care our hospital is staffed and equipped to offer.

Your Hospital continues to provide a large volume of service without cost to patients who cannot pay their own way and do not have adequate coverage from insurance or a sponsoring agency. Last year North Carolina Baptists gave over \$600,000 through the Cooperative Program and the Mother's Day Offering which covered less than one-third of this cost, not including physician's fees.

The financial situation of the Hospital is viewed by the administration with "cautious optimism". The operating deficit has been reduced and expenditures are being kept more nearly in line with income. The entire staff is cooperating in an effort to maintain a proper balance between sound financial policies and a spirit of Christian compassion.

The Medical Center Development Program is progressing on schedule. The new patient Tower is expected to be ready for partial occupancy by late 1972. The 14 bed coronary unit will be open about September, 1971. A statewide Development Campaign, initiated with pledges totaling \$177,182 from employees of the Medical Center, is moving toward successful completion.

Baptist Hospital offers a ministry of healing in Christ's name to all who need it. It seeks to fulfill the same purpose in North Carolina that a Baptist Hospital operated by our Foreign Mission Board seeks to fulfill in Korea or Nigeria. It ought to be supported by missionary minded Baptists with the same enthusiasm and for the same reason we support every other phase of our denomination's World Mission Program. This is missions, too.

All 48 churches in the French Broad Association gave \$3,709.91 to the support of the Hospital.

## A VISION OF WHAT MIGHT BE IN SPILLCORN

Certainly the work here has been exciting and challenging to me both of the summers I have served here as a summer missionary. The need for something more definite here than just what has been offered through me, is desperately needed, as Mrs. Franklin of the Missions committee can testify to.

Although a full time program is needed, I do not envision it as being completely self-sustaining. A full time minister on the field with an outgoing personality such as E.J. Jenkins or Gordon Ball, would see some very effective results. Someone is needed who will not be afraid to challenge the very best from the folks here. A church building of some kind would be needed and it would be very important that such a building not

built completely through Home Mission Board Funds. The people here would need to pledge a certain number of blocks or donate a portion of their time to the building of it. It must be a cooperative effort and not the work of just one or two families. The main bone of contention in the Community Church here is that it is owned by one family and they determine when and if the doors of the church will be opened.

I envision a man on the field who will be able to lead the young men here to a more creative use of their leisure time. Most of the young men spend their weekends "just loafin'" with no purpose or direction in their lives. I feel that a man and his wife could fill a tremendous void which exists here.

During the long winter months there is just nothing here for the folks to be involved in. Creative crafts which could be turned into money making crafts could be developed, then the folks here would feel a sense of satisfaction. The Opportunity Corp. in Marshall has such a craft program available and we should help the people here to avail themselves of this opportunity. It would improve their own self-respect and self-image.

A kindergarten program would be of invaluable help to the people here. Transportation and supplies plus the salary of the worker would probably be more than this community alone could bear but they would try very hard. Boys clubs and girls clubs would be effective.

Just this past week a twenty year old girl remarked to me (and she said nothing about even thinking about some type of full time program here) she wished that some denomination could come up here to help unite the people instead of having so much checking as she sees in the church here. I share her thought along this line.

Right now I cannot think of anything to add to this projection but as thoughts come, I will be glad to share them with Mr. Jenkins and the Missions Committee.

## ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The Annuity Board was established in 1918 to assist its pastors financially in their retirement. Today the Annuity Board offers protection not just for the pastor but to his children and widow. This plan is also available to all full time church workers and ministerial students.

The Retirement Plan provides monthly income for life after retirement. To this plan has been added a provision to pay the widow of any participating pastor who dies before reaching age forty an amount equal to one year's salary on which dues were paid, double if death results from accident. There is no extra cost for this additional provision.

For an added one per cent of the pastor's salary, he can get a Life Plan which includes protection up to \$30,000.00 with double indemnity. This plan is also available to ministerial students.

A Hospitalization Plan is also available to all full time church workers and families.

At the present time our Association has ten participating churches and members. Full information can be obtained by writing to the Rev. Guy Gain, Baptist Building, Raleigh, N.C.

## BELVA MISSION

Belva Baptist Mission, located on Greenville, Tennessee Highway 25 just this side of the Tennessee-N.C. line, at the mouth of Shelton Laurel, has been in operation for a number of years as a community church. Since March of 1969, Grasse Branch Baptist Church at Oteen has sponsored the newly organized work. Rev. Brown of Swannanoa has served as pastor until June 1. Since then the Supt. of Missions has supplied.

There is work to be done in all parts of our association, but here is an opportunity to reach a complete new area for Baptist work. Pray for God's leadership in this matter.

### HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Progress is continuing among the churches in addition to and in the beautification of their places of worship and teaching. At least three churches have made additions to their buildings during the associational year. Chapel Hill has added four beautifully paneled classrooms. Grandview has remodeled its building inside and out and added

a steeple. Mount Sheba is well along with its two-story fellowship hall. Locust Grove has installed air conditioning. Madison Seminary has paid off the indebtedness on its new building and burned the final note. Mars Hill has done an extensive painting job on the exterior and interior of the building. Bull Creek and Hot Springs have plans underway for new auditoriums. Calvary is steadily increasing its growing fund for a larger building on a new location.

Fewer churches have reported Vacation Bible Schools this summer than formerly. Special mention should be made of two Bible Schools: One at Alexander, which had a Sunday School enrollment of 127, had 176 enrolled for Vacation Bible School. Union Valley had a large attendance, with a number of professions of faith and a generous offering for the Cooperative Program.

Two thriving missions have been started within the boundaries of the association: one at Belva, sponsored by the association, and one at Spillcorn, sponsored by the Home Mission Board and the State Baptist Convention. Sixty-eight were enrolled at the successful associational summer camp, held at Rich Laurel Wild-life Preserve.

Pastor Lester Murphy has written a brief but impressive and valuable history of the Hot Springs Church. Other churches should be reminded to do likewise to preserve their records. Each church might appoint a competent historian to collect and preserve accurate facts concerning the church before it is too late.

The distressing report that ten churches of the association have been without pastors this year should be of concern to all of us. Perhaps the executive committee or some other should make a thorough study of the situation and make suggestions for a solution. Congregations are expecting of pastors now than hitherto, and the need requires more than some of them can afford. Certainly this condition is placing more responsibility on lay members of the churches. "The old order changes, giving place to new, and God fulfills Himself in many ways." Fortunately the French Broad Association is located in a region where changes are less abrupt and violent than in many others.

Madison county is no longer an area of isolated communities. Means of rapid transportation, and instant communication have brought all into contact with others in committees, the world, and even the moon.

The new consolidated high school, connected by better highways, will bring youth together from all parts of the county. Land values are rising. Per capita income is increasing and modern homes are replacing the simple dwellings of other days. Technology is providing physical comforts our forbears never dreamed of. The poet warns us, however with the words: "I'll fared the land and to hastening ills a prey; When wealth accumulates and men decay."

The question arises whether our churches, whose programs are adapted to former times, are prepared to meet the spiritual needs of the day. More zeal and dedication among those who comprise the body of Christ are required if the churches fulfill their mission of reconciliation and redemption.

## CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS REPORT

Books have been kept in detail about what each of us has done in this phase of our Christian work. Most of it is being kept secret for a while but we have been watched even when we didn't know it and the reports written down.

I am allowed, however, to tell some things that I know have been done. Letters have been written to Governor Scott and to Liston Ramsey about the liquor question urging that the sale be curbed. Some have urged that the death penalty be abolished. Most of us have set a good example before the young people by refusing to drink any alcoholic liquor of any sort.

"Civic righteousness" sounds so indefinite we hardly know what our responsibility about it is. But I have found some exact rules. (1) "Don't say bad things about our officers." Thou shalt not speak evil of the ruler of thy people." (Nixon, Congress, etc.) (2) "Don't try to get our of paying our taxes." Jesus paid his. "They came to Peter and said, 'Doth not your master pay tribute' He saith 'Yes.' " Matt. 17:24,25. (3) "We must keep the laws, whether we like them or not." "Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man - unto governors and unto those sent by him" I Peter 2: 13, 14. "Put them in mind to obey magistrates." Titus 2:1. "Let every soul be subjected unto the higher powers. The powers are ordained of God." Romans 13:1.

Now there is a special new matter coming up for consideration in this session of the legislature: Governor Scott has had a large committee of lawyers investigating every department of our penal system - the laws dealing with offenders, the penalties put on them, their treatment in prisons, the prison buildings themselves, etc. Many recommendations have been made. What can be done? It will depend on the amount of money the appropriations committee will set aside for this work. The governor has asked that we use our influence every way we can to bring about the needed reforms, by talking and agitating till it is done. Jesus said that the way we treated prisoners is the way we are treating him.

As a close to this report, something else should be said about those secret books. We don't want to be spied on. We want privacy. But we haven't got it. They even have mind readers yes, they have found our thoughts. And the Bible says the thought of foolishness is sin.

Where art the books? Revelation 20:12 tells us "And I saw the dead, small and great, stand before God: and the books were opened: - and the dead were judged out of those things which were written in the books, according to their works."

But we can have a clear record in our book. When we confess our sins and repent (and sins of omission are as bad as those sins of commission) then the blood of Jesus wipes out those sins out of our books. I know that this group I am addressing are those that have good records. Dear Christian friends, let's work as never before. Life is short, Eternity is just around the bend. Let us not "despise the day of small things" (Zech. 4:10) What the Holy Spirit shows us to do will have God's blessing. Who knows what little act of ours will be just what is needed.

"I am only one, but I am One. What I can do, I ought to do. And what I ought to do by God's help I will do.

## AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

In this first year of a new decade when Southern Baptists are re-examining the Spirit of Christ, the American Bible Society's statement of purpose takes on new meaning and significance. In the words of ABS General Secretary Laton E. Holmgren: "The sole purpose of all Bible Society activity is - and always has been - to provide men, in intelligible and convincing speech, with the record of the 'wonderful works of God' ... It is this concern for the redemption of the world - for the whole life of the whole man in the whole world - that permeates the work and witness of all those concerned with the Bible Society movement - If possible, every man on earth must be told of the Savior in his own tongue and given the opportunity to surrender his life to Him. This can only be done if we 'press with vigor on.' "

The American Bible Society is grateful for the privilege of serving as a partner of Southern Baptists in providing the Bible as a tool for missions. We are aware of the need not only to keep up with the normal increase in demand for the written Word, but to foresee the conditions and circumstances within which people will be living in this decade of the Seventies.

As a missionary non-profit organization, it serves churches of many denominations at home and abroad. It helps missionaries translate the Bible. It publishes without note or comment. It distributes without profit, usually below cost, and without any charge in cases of special need. For the Blind it supplies Scriptures in Braille and other raised-letter systems, Talking Bible records and tape recordings.

During 1970 the American Bible Society -

aided in providing technical assistance to more than 3,000 translators working in more than 800 languages and dialects. At the close of 1970 at least one book of the Bible has been published in 1,431 languages: the Bible in 249, a Testament in 329 more, and portions in 853. Many, however, still wait for the Bible in their own language.

donated 4,323,599 Scriptures for chaplains to the Armed Services, a 94.3 per cent increase over 1969. Many of these were distributed by Southern Baptist chaplains.

distributed 99,595,465 Bibles, Testaments, Portions and Selections, a 30.7 per cent increase over 1969. An attempt was made to reach every home in South Carolina and Arizona with a New Testament or a packet of specially designed Selections. The world distribution of all the Bible Societies totaled 173 million, equivalent to one copy for every 21 persons in the world.

continued to develop Scriptures in every day speech. "Good News for Modern Man" in Today's English Version New Testament published in September, 1966 has a distribution of 25 million copies. On December 1, 1970 the first book of the Old Testament, "The Psalms for Modern Man" was available in Today's English Version. Job is to be available in the fall of 1971 in time for the Southern Baptists' January Bible Study.

# Constitution

1970

## ARTICLE I - Name

The name of this body shall be the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association.

## ARTICLE II - Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be:

1. To coordinate and promote fellowship and growth, missions, Christian education, and involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors.
2. To cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in Kingdom advancement.
3. The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association.

## ARTICLE III - Membership

### SECTION I. Member Churches

1. This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist churches in this general area that have been formally accepted as members and who continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association; by naming messengers to the annual meetings; and by reporting to such annual meetings on forms provided by the Association.

2. A church seeking admission to membership in the Association may make application in the following manner:

a. Decision to seek such admission shall have been determined by vote of the church in formal business session.

b. Copies of the Confession of Faith and the Covenant adopted by the church shall accompany the application.

c. Completed application shall be submitted to the Committee on Reception of New Members previous to the opening of an annual meeting of the Association.

3. The Committee on Reception of New Members shall report its findings to the Association on the first day of the annual session following its examination of any application. Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day, each church thus accepted will be enrolled as a member of the Association, and the moderator will extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers present.

4. Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another association or to remain unattached, it should proceed in the following manner:

a. Decision to withdraw shall have been determined in formal business session.

b. A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session should be submitted to the Moderator of the Association.

c. The Moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has towards the Association.

d. The committee shall report its findings to the Association in annual session, and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. The Association in annual session by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or when the church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association.

### SECTION II. Membership of the Annual Meetings of the Association

1. The elected officers of the Association, all pastors of member churches, and provided they are members of member churches, all persons reporting on any phase of the work of the Association, shall be EX OFFICIO members of the annual meetings.

2. Each member church is entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members above fifty, except that no church shall have more than ten messengers exclusive of the EX OFFICIO members designated

above.

3. The EX OFFICIO members in attendance and the elected messengers presenting certification of their election by their churches shall constitute the official voting enrollment in any annual session.

#### ARTICLE IV - Officers

SECTION I. The Officers of the Association shall be:

1. Moderator, Vice moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of Missions (ex officio), Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, Director of Missions, and Director of Evangelism.

SECTION II. Election of Officers:

1. The Moderator, Vice moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be elected as follows: the incumbent Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee; this committee shall present a slate of names to which may be added nominations from the floor. Such nominations shall be voted upon during the first session of the annual meeting.

2. The Missions Committee shall recommend a Superintendent of Missions when there is a vacancy; election shall be by majority vote of the Association, and for an indefinite period.

3. The Associational Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood shall select directors for their respective organizations, and recommend these persons to the Nominating Committee to be presented with the other nominees proposed for election.

SECTION III. Terms of office shall be as follows:

1. All elected officers shall take office at the close of the last session of the annual associational meeting.

2. The duties of the Clerk serving during the current session are not ended, however, until the work of the session is completed and the minutes printed and distributed.

3. The Moderator may serve no more than four years consecutively.

4. All committee members appointed and elected in the annual session shall begin their work at the close of the annual meeting and continue through the next annual session of the Association.

#### ARTICLE V - Executive Committee

SECTION I. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers named in Article IV, and one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, with the Moderator as Chairman.

SECTION II. The Moderator, Vice moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by the Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the Committee.

SECTION III. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

1. To act in behalf of the Association between annual meetings of the Association.

2. To carry out the plans laid at the annual session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the associational work.

3. No obligations to exceed \$500 may be undertaken by the Executive Committee on behalf of the Association, without specific authority from the Association.

## ARTICLE VI - Missions Committee

**SECTION I.** The Missions Committee shall be composed of a Director and eleven additional members recommended by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association in annual meeting. All mission work sponsored by the Association shall be under the supervision and direction of the Missions Committee.

**SECTION II.** Duties of the Missions Committee:

1. This Committee shall, when a vacancy occurs in the office of Superintendent of Missions, recommend a successor based upon the approved job description, to the annual meeting, or to a special called meeting of the Association.

2. It shall work in cooperation with the Director of Missions of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.

3. It shall supervise the activities of, and work with, the Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association.

4. It shall meet quarterly receiving written monthly reports from the Superintendent of Missions and make suggestions to him concerning the work of the Association.

5. It shall advise any group seeking to organize a mission or church.

6. It shall assist, upon request, churches with particular problems.

7. It shall maintain awareness of the mission needs of the churches in the Association and be ready to recommend ways in which these needs may be met.

8. It shall prepare and present a budget to the annual meeting of the Association.

**SECTION III.** The Missions Committee shall recommend to the Association for approval a job description for the Superintendent of Missions, who will serve as ex officio member of all committees.

## ARTICLE VII - Steering Committee

**SECTION I.** The Steering Committee shall be composed of the Vice Moderator as chairman, the pastors of the member churches, and two lay members elected by each church and named in the associational letter.

**SECTION II.** The responsibilities of the Steering Committee shall be:

1. To meet quarterly with the Executive Committee to consider the Kingdom work in the Association.

2. To assist in the promotion of the work of the Association in the churches.

3. To assist committee's reports in acquainting the churches with different phases of the work.

## ARTICLE VIII - Other Committees

**SECTION I.** The following committees shall be composed of three or more members each. They shall be appointed by the Moderator and the Committee on Committees, at the annual associational meeting, to serve in the ensuing year and for the next annual meeting.

**SECTION II.** Duties of these committees shall be:

1. **Committee on Committees:** to work with the Moderator in the annual session in the appointment of committees.

2. **Nominating Committee:** to nominate the associational officers and recommend to the Executive Committee replacements for vacancies occurring during the year. Nominations shall first have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.

3. Committee on Reports:

a. This committee shall inform our people about the work they have been chosen to represent and lead in promoting it.

b. They shall make brief written reports to the annual associational meeting.

c. This committee consists of a member for each of the following phases of work: Evangelism, Cooperative Program, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

4. Program Committee:

a. This committee shall prepare a printed program for the annual associational meeting, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors.

b. This committee shall, in the opening meeting, present the printed program for adoption with necessary adjustments.

5. Committee on Places and Preachers:

a. This committee shall recommend the time and place or places for the next annual associational meeting.

b. This committee shall recommend the preachers and alternates for the Associational Sermon and the Missionary Sermon.

6. Constitutional Amendment Committee:

a. This committee shall consider and recommend changes in this Constitution which have been referred to them in the regular annual meeting.

b. This committee shall recommend changes in this Constitution that become necessary for clarity and for the proper functioning of the associational work.

7. Committee on Resolutions:

a. This committee shall consider and present to the annual associational meeting any resolutions referred to them.

b. They shall prepare and present any further resolutions deemed expedient to them.

8. Youth Committee:

a. This committee shall work with, in advisory capacity, the youth of the Association.

b. They shall promote programs that are of interest to the youth, such as music festivals, camps, retreats, study courses, fellowships, and the like.

9. Ordination Committee:

a. When so requested by a member church, they shall examine any candidate for the gospel ministry, in matters of life, doctrine, personal faith, cooperation, and any others relating to the ministerial call.

b. Upon approval, they shall recommend the ordination of this candidate.

10. Seminary Extension Committee: they shall promote and direct the Seminary Extension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director and Registrar annually. They shall appoint teachers in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for classes in this program.

ARTICLE IX - Annual Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be on Thursday and Friday following the first Sunday in August.

## ARTICLE X - Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting on the second day.

## ARTICLE XI - Parliamentary Authority

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned.

# Proceedings

The one hundred sixty fifth annual session of the French Broad Baptist Association was called to order at the Mt. Sheba Baptist Church on August 10, 1972, at seven thirty P.M. by the Moderator, Rev. Gordon Ball.

Mrs. David Roberts led the congregation in singing Hymn N. 381, "Stand Up Stand Up for Jesus". Following the hymn, Rev. Fred Jarvis, pastor of the host church welcomed the delegates and brought the devotions, using the youth choir from the church. They sang "I'll Be Satisfied" and "I Shall Not Be Moved".

The messengers were seated and Rev. Ralph Hogan presented the Program Committee report. He indicated that changes would be made as necessity required. Program adopted.

A digest of the church letters was given by the clerk. Following this, reports of progress in various phases of Baptist work were presented. The first report was the Executive Committee report given by Rev. Gordon Ball. Report adopted. Report #1.

Perry Willis moved the adoption of the World Missions Report. This report is a collective report of State, Home and Foreign Missions. Report #2 was adopted.

Mrs. C.R. Cohn moved the adoption of the Cooperative Program report. Report adopted. Report #3. Mr. Bob Broome from the N.C. Baptist State Convention spoke to the report.

The treasurers report was read by Vance Edwards, Associational treasurer. Report #4 adopted.

Following the roll call of the churches, Mr. Jenkins recognized new pastors of our Association. He also recognized the visitors to our meeting.

Reverend M.H. Kendall, chairman of the committee on committees and the nominating committee presented the reports of these committees - with the exception of Church Training Director. Reports #5 and #6 were adopted.

Mr. Wade Huey, chairman of the Missions Committee was recognized. The Missions Committee report was adopted. Following this the budget for the coming year was read by Mr. Huey. It was approved. See reports #7 and #8. Mr. Huey reported the committee to find a home for the Superintendent of Missions was still at work. No suitable site for a home and an Associational Camp has been found. The committee consists of Mr. Rex Allen, Mr. Vance Edwards, and Mr. Wade Huey.

Mr. Bruce Phillips, chairman of the Constitutional Amendment Committee, read the proposed amendments. A two-thirds majority of delegates voted for the amendments. No votes against. See report #9.

Reverend M.H. Kendall, chairman of committee on reception of new members made a motion that Belva Baptist Church, a newly organized fellowship, be admitted into our Association. The vote will be taken during the Friday morning session. He also made the motion to receive Hopewell Baptist Church into the Association. Hopewell church has been a member of the Newfound Association, but has worked closely with our Association for many years, and at their request the motion was made to receive them. The vote to be taken during the Friday morning session.

Reverend Roy Keller, pastor of the Bull Creek Baptist Church delivered the Associational Sermon, using as his text Matt. 5:14-16. Following the sermon the first session of the one hundred sixty fifth annual meeting of the French Broad Baptist Association was adjourned with prayer.

### Friday Morning Session

The second session of the one hundred sixty fifth annual meeting of the French Broad Baptist Association was called to order by Rev. Gordon Ball, Moderator, at nine thirty A.M. on Friday Aug. 10, 1972, at the Forks of Ivy Baptist Church.

The Reverend Donald Gasperson, pastor of the Bethel Baptist Church led in a devotional period, using as his thought I Corinthians 12:31-13:4.

Reverend Lester Murphey moved the adoption of the Sunday School report, Report adopted, Report #10.

Mrs. Locke Robinson, W.M.U. Director, moved the adoption of the Woman's Missionary Union Report, Report #11 adopted.

Mrs. Dorothy Roberts moved the adoption of the music report, Report #12 adopted.

The report of Christian Higher Education was given by Miss Sue Fitzgerald, Dr. Bentley spoke to the report, Report adopted, See report #13.

The Church Training report was adopted. Rev. Truman Fisher, Director of Church Training has worked faithfully during the year to improve the training program in all our churches. He is to be commended for his work, See report #14.

The Brotherhood report was adopted, Report #15.

Rev. Richard Price asked that the Annuity Board Report be adopted at this time. Report adopted, Report #16. Mr. Guy Cain spoke to the report.

The Vacation Bible School report was adopted, See report #17.

Rev. Robert Holt, chairman of the Seminary Extension Committee moved the adoption of that report. Following its adoption Mr. Holt spoke concerning the importance of the seminary extension work, See report #18.

After a congregational hymn, "Love Divine, All Love Excelling" Mr. Jenkins recognized the visitors.

At this time, the vote to amend the Constitution was taken, Section III, Part 2 of the proposed amendment was approved, Section II Article 10 Committee on Church College relations, Dr. Bentley objected to section b and c of proposed amendment. He made the motion that b and c be deleted from the amendment. A discussion period followed with time period expiring. A motion was made to extend the time until matter could be settled. A vote was taken to delete these parts (b and c). A majority voted against deleting parts b, and c. A motion was made to amend the amendment by adding "the committee is to work with the Institution involved". A vote was taken and the amendment passed. The moderator explained that a vote now was to be taken for a major Constitutional change and it required a two-thirds majority. Vote taken and the count was 32 for and 20 against. This was not a two-thirds majority so the Moderator ruled there was not church college relations committee. Rev. Gene Hall,

pastor of the Madison Seminary Church asked for another vote. Vote was taken, same count, Moderator did not change his ruling.

The vote was taken to admit Belva Baptist Church and Hopewell Baptist Church into our Association. Both churches were brought into our fellowship and the Moderator stated after the sermon we would extend to their delegates the right hand of Christian Fellowship and welcome them into our midst.

Following a hymn, the Rev. Fred Jarvis brought the Missionary sermon. The session was closed by prayer.

Following a delicious lunch, prepared by the ladies of the Forks of Ivy Church, Mr. Bruce Phillips called the afternoon session of the annual meeting to order. A devotional period was led by Mr. Frank Plemmons. He used as his scripture Romans 1:14-16.

The report of the Baptist Children's Home was adopted. Mr. Clyde Morris spoke to the report. See report #19.

The report on the Baptist Home for the aged was adopted. See report #20.

Rev. John Bussard moved the adoption of the Baptist Hospital report. Mr. Calvin Knight spoke to the report. Report #21. Adopted.

Mr. Jenkins moved the adoption of the superintendent of Missions report. He spoke to the report. Report adopted, #22.

Mr. J. A. McLeod moved the adoption of his last Historian report. Mr. McLeod has been our faithful historian for a long period. Report adopted #23. Mr. Joe Morgan expressed appreciation to Mr. McLeod for his work during the last few years.

The Civic Righteousness report was adopted. No. 24.

Mr. Jenkins moved the adoption of the American Bible Society report. Report adopted, #25.

Rev. Roy Keller moved the adoption of the Committee on reports. Report #27 adopted.

The Place and Preachers report was adopted #28.

The Resolution Committee report was adopted #29.

During the afternoon business session Rev. Truman Fisher questioned the validity of the morning vote regarding the veto of the church college relations committee and their duties. A discussion followed. After the period of discussion, the following motion was made by the Rev. Gene Hall: "32-20 vote in second session stand and clarification of its validity be considered later by a meeting of the Executive Committee. Motion passed.

While the audience stood as a symbol of respect and in remembrance of, the names of Our Beloved Dead were read by the clerk.

The one hundred sixty fifth annual meeting of the French Broad Baptist Association was dismissed with prayer by the Rev. Gordon Ball.

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee met in regular scheduled sessions at Mars Hill Baptist Church on September 12, November 14, 1971, January 9 and July 9, 1972. There wasn't enough people at the April meeting to transact business, according to the Constitution.

At the September meeting, Rev. Arthur Ammons, vice moderator, informed the

Executive Committee that he was pastoring outside the association. He asked the Executive Committee advise on whether or not to remain an officer of the association. The committee expressed feelings of his continuing of service as long as no conflict arose.

Motion was made to accept the Southern Baptist Press' bid on the printing of our minutes, with the inside page being dedicated to Mr. Fred Jarvis, Motion passed.

A motion was made to ask the Constitutional Amendment Committee to make recommendations of amendments to formulate a Church-College Relations Committee and to give guidelines for the carrying out of their work, Motion passed.

The associational officers gave a report of their work, Rev. Keller, Chairman of Evangelism, announced plans for Associational revivals to be held at Forks of Ivy Baptist Church and Walnut Creek Baptist Church. All offerings were to go to the Associational budget.

At the November meeting, a motion was made that the Executive Committee commend Dr. Fred Bentley, President of Mars Hill College, for his action concerning the drug situation on the college campus. Motion was carried and copies of the letter was sent to the President's office, chairman of the Board of Trustees and Dr. Perry Crouch, General Secretary of the N.C. State Convention.

Chairman of the Missions Committee made a motion that we ask the State Baptist Convention for \$2,004.00 per year to help with our associational budget. Motion passed.

Rev. Arthur Ammons resigned as vice moderator and his resignation was accepted. The chairman of the Nominating Committee was informed of the need to appoint a vice moderator.

Rev. E.J. Jenkins suggested plans for a world missions conference. After much discussion and information, motion was made and passed to have a world missions conference in November 1973.

Associational officers gave reports of their work, Rev. Truman Fisher, Director of Church Training, announced plans for M-Night to be held at Upper Laurel and plans for training associational officers in Training Union.

Mrs. Robinson, WMU Director, encouraged a large Lottie Moon Christmas offering.

Rev. Ralph Hogan, Brotherhood Director, informed us of the success of the Baptist Men and Boys Banquet at Marshall Baptist Church with 10 churches represented.

Vance Edwards, treasurer, was forever informing us of the amount of money we had in the treasury and how much we needed for the coming month.

At the January meeting a letter from Dr. Bentley was read. He expressed his appreciation to the Committee for the vote of confidence and concern given him in the handling of the drug incident at the College.

Rev. Truman Fisher announced a banquet for pastors and training union directors at Bull Creek.

Mrs. Robinson stressed Home Mission Study and Annie Armstrong offering.

The Fifth Sunday Hymn Sing at California Creek was announced by Mrs. Roberts.

Rev. Ralph Hogan announced the Brotherhood Retreat in January.

At the meeting in July, Mr. Kenneth Pike announced, in the absence of Rev. Truman Fisher, Church Training Director, plans for a workshop for all training union workers at Forks of Ivy and Madison Seminary.

Mr. Huey, chairman of the Missions Committee, reports the purchase of a bus for Spillcorn Mission at a cost of \$400.00. The expense being met by special donations to the Spillcorn work. The Executive Committee approved and commended the Missions Committee for their work.

The Executive Committee was informed of the desire of Belva Mission to be constituted into a church the fourth Sunday in July and a notification of their plans to become a part of the association. A copy of the Articles of Faith and the Constitution were given to the chairman of the Missions Committee and were to be given to the chairman of the Committee of Reception of New Members.

I would like to express my appreciation to each member of the Executive Committee for their work and co-operation.

What helps us to grow toward wholeness, to be a maturing Christian. Many things should help us.

One thing that is constantly seeking to help persons to grow toward wholeness is our colleges. Baptist colleges, of which we have seven in our state—Chowan, Campbell, Gardner Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest and Wingate, strive toward this goal. A Christian college sees the whole person as important and seeks to help each student to grow in his relationship to God, man, society and himself. The Christian College is not just interested in cramming into a person a bunch of facts, although facts are important. It is not just interested in giving a person a job skill, although this also is important. It is interested in these, but in context with a greater objective of helping him know himself in relation to God, to know himself in relation to the past, present and future, to see himself in his own environment, to feel and taste of the beauty of life, to understand his interdependence with all God's creatures. Our colleges are trying to do all this.

To meet these objectives takes faculty and administration who are willing to struggle together. Right now Mars Hill is looking at its own program objectively. They say they want to be sure they are doing what they say they are doing. That takes courage, not just for a college, but for all of us, to face honestly ourselves and our

work. To strive toward these goals takes patience and love. It takes patience and love to work with the unlovable student. All students aren't lovable or cooperative or eager to learn or care about others. What can we do with these? Lets just kick them out and just keep the students who are sweet and nice and good. The Pharisees felt this way, but Jesus loved them all, ministered to their needs and tried to help each one to be a whole person. The colleges are committed to care for all who come, to help them in love, to help the unlovable to grow toward wholeness, as well as to help the lovable ones to know life in a deeper way.

Our schools are committed to care. Are we? They need our money, but they need more than this. They need our love, our caring, our prayers, our concern. When we limit our love, whether out of unconcern or fear or disgust or ignorance, we are limiting the other person's possibility of growth. When we limit our love, we hinder the maximum effective work of our institutions. What is your part going to be?

## ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The Annuity Board was established in 1918 to assist its pastors financially in their retirement. Today the Annuity Board offers protection not just for the pastor but to his children and widow. This plan is also available to all full time church workers and ministerial students.

The Retirement Plan provides monthly income for life after retirement. To this plan has been added a provision to pay the widow of any participating pastor who dies before reaching age forty an amount equal to one year's salary on which dues were paid, double if death results from accident. There is no extra cost for this additional provision.

For an added one per cent of the pastor's salary, he can get a Life Plan which includes protection up to \$30,000.00 with double indemnity. This plan is also available to ministerial students.

A Hospitalization Plan is also available to all full time church workers and families.

At the present time our Association has 12 participating churches and Members.

## VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

Vacation Bible School is one of the most challenging and rewarding ministries of the entire church year. There are many opportunities to make permanent spiritual and moral contributions to the lives of children and youth. We had a good year. Our teachers attended the State Clinic at Wingate and came back and led our association in a good clinic. 38 of the 48 churches had a Vacation Bible School along with Hope-well, Spillcorn and Belva. Approximately 2,031 were enrolled. All except three used

Convention Press materials. This year there were only 10 churches not reporting a school over against 15 not reporting a school last year. The enrolment this year was 2,031 over against 1,797 last year. A good increase.

The results were outstanding in the number of professions of faith, the amount given to the Cooperative Program, increase in Sunday School, etc. Truly it is a rewarding ministry.

## SEMINARY EXTENSION REPORT

The Seminary Extension Department provides the best in off-campus study. The program is directed jointly through the six Southern Baptist Seminaries. The program is designed to develop leaders, provide instruction in Bible doctrines, church history, preaching, religious education, music and other vital subjects. There are three basic certificates: Biblical Studies, Theological Studies, and Historical and Practical Studies.

The Extension classes in our association this year were well attended. The spring session had 98 enrolled, and the fall session had 119 enrolled with 188 students receiving credit toward one or more of the certificates. The teachers this year were: Rev. Kendall, Miss Sue Fitzgerald, Dr. Godwin, Rev. Ralph Hogan and Rev. W.L. Lynch. The classes were held with Forks of Ivy, Laurel Chapel, North Fork, California Creek, Hopewell and Ivy Hill. The students paid for their textbooks and the State Baptist Convention paid for the tuition and workbooks as well as travel for the teachers.

We are thankful to our people for taking advantage of these studies, for churches providing space, for the wonderful spirit of dedication of our teachers and the state for their help without which I doubt we could have operated; not near as effectively anyway.

More of our churches should promote this study for their teachers and leaders. More of our pastors could avail themselves of this opportunity. These studies will help men and women become better preachers, teachers, leaders and better thinkers, and develop the skill of interpreting and explaining God's Word.

## BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Building a better tomorrow has always been the dedicated concern of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. Today's Children will become the adults who shape tomorrow's world. No task is more important than helping Children hurt by life, to grow into well respected, responsible citizens and Christian men and women.

The children comprising the population of our Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc. are, in large part, dependent upon North Carolina Baptists for their present support and future well-being. Contributing to them now is, in reality, contributing to better future citizenship in our state and nation, to say nothing of that infinitely greater good, which is the eternal welfare of the soul.

Broyhill Home in Haywood County, opened in 1971, has served to strengthen all of our services to children and members of their families in the Western area of the State. This facility has been a blessing to the twenty-nine children who live there as well as those who have made it possible. The children have adjusted readily to the school, church and community life in general. They are happy with the beautiful and comfortable cottages in which they live and are responding in a wonderful way to the Christian love and care provided them by members of the staff.

Through the generosity of many friends, we have under construction two additional cottages at Broyhill Home. One is being made possible by the people of the Haywood Baptist Association - the other by members of the J.E. Broyhill family of Lenoir for whom the campus is named. When completed in December of this year we will have four cottages with a capacity for a little over fifty children. Yet to be built is the administration building and a home for the local superintendent.

The Maternity Home in Asheville has been in operation for two years and has met a great need in the lives of more than thirty girls with whom we have worked. Many lives have been changed for good for time and eternity as a result of this ministry.

The contributions of our Baptist people through the Cooperative Program, the Thanksgiving Offering and special gifts are essential to our continued operation and are received with deep appreciation. An increasing number of friends are finding rewarding stewardship opportunities through the establishment of trusts for the Homes and by means of wills and estate planning for the needs of dependent children.

The churches of the French Broad Association, during the year 1971-72, gave \$4,972.84 to our Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. However, this amount does not reflect contributions from 100% of all churches. We would like to urge all of our churches to give to this worthwhile cause so that we may be 100% for the year 1972-73.

It shall be the purpose of the Homes in the future, as in the past, to provide a strong child care and family service ministry in an effort to meet the needs of those who turn to us for assistance. Your continuing interest, prayers and support are essential to this great and vital ministry.

## NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

In our Baptist Homes for the Aging, we feel that there is no relationship more important and more blessed than the one that we have with our Baptist people in our Baptist Associations throughout the State. It is a special joy to visit personally the Associations and to have fellowship with the good people who mean so much to us in our ministry and to express to them our special thanksgiving. It is with a deep sense of gratitude to the Lord and to you that we bring this report on our Baptist Homes for 1972.

This has been the best year that we have ever had in our twenty-one years. The Special Offering for the Homes and support through the Cooperative Program reflect an encouraging increase. Through these two vital sources, the Homes during the past year derived almost 30% of the total operating budget in the care of the residents and patients, with 20% coming from the offering, and 10% through the Cooperative

Program. The most significant fact about this support from our Baptist people is that the majority of the residents in the Homes are persons with real financial needs, and these love gifts are used for their care. In fact, these gifts are a lifeline to the residents, and they could not be maintained without them. The greatest challenge to our Baptist people is to continue to increase the Special Offering from year to year, and thus keep pace with the needs of the residents who depend so greatly on it.

Our Baptist Homes now operate five resident Homes, with two located in Winston-Salem, and one each in Albemarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville. These Homes have a capacity for 162 residents, in addition, there is a Nursing Care Unit, located in Winston-Salem, with a capacity for 63 patients. In these Homes we specialize in tender loving care and do not know of any place this side of Heaven, and outside of one's home, where a person can receive more compassionate Christian care.

Of great significance during the past year, in May, was the dedication of the York Wing of the Nursing Care Unit. This wing, accomodating 18 additional patients was completed in November of 1971 and named in honor of Judge and Mrs. William York, of Greensboro. He and Mrs. York gave \$80,000.00 for the construction of this new Wing, and the additional money needed was raised by the Trustees of the Homes. With this new addition, the Baptist Homes have been able to receive some few persons, on a limited basis only, directly as patients. The majority of the beds in the Nursing Care Unit are used for the residents of the five Homes, when nursing care becomes necessary. We are glad that the base of our operation has been broadened to include a ministry to the aging sick person, and we can only hope that we will move forward and be able to receive more patients in the years ahead.

Ministry to an older person is a direct ministry to Christ and is one of the finest things that North Carolina Baptists are doing. Be glad that you are a Baptist, and be grateful for the part that you are having in making the life of an aging person more abundant and more secure.

## BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

The distinctiveness of Baptist Hospital's ministry lies not alone in its care for charity patients, but also in the type of service it renders to all its patients, and to many other people throughout our state and nation and around the world.

As an academic Medical Center it is engaged in research and in education, as well as direct patient care. The ministry through research is far-reaching since new discoveries in medicine offer new hope to people everywhere. The educational ministry also extends around the world, since graduates of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine serve in 88 counties of North Carolina, and in 47 states and the District of Columbia, and in 25 different countries. Alumni of the School of Pastoral Care serve in almost every state and in 39 other countries.

The quality of direct patient care provided at Baptist Hospital is distinct in at least two respects. First, it is a specialized type of medical care, provided for referral patients who have rare or complicated medical problems. Because of the highly-skilled specialists in almost every area of medicine, and the elaborate equipment available for diagnosis and treatment, we are able to provide the kind of care which is available only in a large medical center. Ours is one of only 108 such medical centers in the United States.

In addition to offering this kind of medical expertise, a second distinctive of our

patient care is the Christian concern for the total person with all his needs. This spirit is found among physicians, nurses, aides, and other personnel throughout the Center. The Department of Pastoral Care seeks to minister specifically to the spiritual and emotional needs of patients and their families.

Baptist Hospital does continue to serve patients who cannot pay for their hospital care. Even with the tightening of admission policies and procedures, only one person in twelve months - i.e., one in approximately 17,000 applications for admissions - was not helped. In 1971, charitable allowances amounting to \$1,370,000 were issued to patients unable to pay in full. The Mother's Day Offering of \$371,000 helped make this charity work possible.

The hospital takes pride in its record of charitable work, but would like to help our Baptist people to understand that there are other aspects of its work also which justify its existence as an institution of our Convention and make it worthy of the support of our churches.

The operating deficit has been eliminated and the hospital is now operating "in the black."

The new patient tower is being completed and some departments have already moved into the lower levels. Complete occupation should take place by January, 1973. One additional unit, a two story unit housing the emergency room and out-patient clinic, is scheduled to be completed by 1973. This will conclude the present development program.

"A Medical Center ministering with skill and understanding" is not just a letter head slogan; it is a goal which Baptist Hospital seriously strives to attain.

The above report has been made available by Mr. Calvin S. Knight.

At this writing we are behind last year on our Mother's Day Offering. Through June 30, 1971, 43 churches had given \$3,709,91 while this year as of June 30, 37 churches have given \$3,205,09. We are \$504,82 behind last year's record with 6 churches less reporting. I hope we can be 100% before the year is complete.

## SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS REPORT 1971-72

Any programs would be totally impossible on my part without the pastors and members. Thank God for each one.

I taught 27 SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSONS, took part in 21 TRAINING UNION discussions, taught 6 BIBLE STUDIES, helped in 1 VBS CLINIC, conducted 7 VBS, visited 26 OTHER VBS, taught in 4 MISSION STUDIES, helped in 4 ORDINATION SERVICES, attended 49 ASSOCIATIONAL MEETINGS, promoted and conducted ASSOCIATIONAL CAMP, preached 119 RADIO PROGRAMS, attended or conducted 8 FUNERALS, took part in 2 WEDDINGS, led in 2 REVIVALS, supplied in 4 CHURCHES without pastors, promoted 2 SEMINARY EXTENSION SESSIONS (spring and fall), had conferences with 258 INDIVIDUALS, 63 GROUPS and 43 COMMITTEES, published and mailed 7,748 Bulletins - 900 calendar of activities, I wrote 3,485 FORM LETTERS; 583 INDIVIDUAL LETTERS, took part in 26 state, regional and southwide meetings, worked in 1 WORLD MISSIONS CONFERENCE in Kentucky, made ??? number of hospital visits, I drove 26,806 miles and traveled many others, The Lord has blessed with 113 conversions, 68 new church members, We constituted Belva into a church and BAPTIZED 9 CONVERTS. We did many other things too numerous to put in a report like this, I thank God for the opportunity of service.

## HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The function of a historian of an association should be to record and interpret current factual information concerning the association and to encourage the preservation of reliable history, not only for the present but also for the future. This I have attempted to do without duplicating other reports, facts, and tables of the minutes.

Continued progress is observed in most of the churches in the association. Financial conditions have improved; income has increased; special offerings have been above average. In addition the churches have contributed \$4,000 to pay off the indebtedness of a mission church in Twin Falls, Idaho. Most of the churches have conducted successful Vacation Bible Schools, Seminary Extension Centers have continued, with four branches or centers participating. Mt. Sheba and Oak Ridge report outstanding youth programs. Hopewell has made application to join the Association this year. Belva Mission is to be constituted as a church the last week in July. The association is sponsoring a mission at the head of Spillcorn, at which services are held on Wednesdays and Sundays, Miss Nancy Knight, a student of the Southern Baptist Seminary, is conducting a week-day ministry in the community. The pastor at Laurel Bend has purchased a trailer and moved it to the church grounds in order to live in the community.

The churches which have reported physical improvements are as follows: Chapel Hill has renovated the interior of the church, brick veneered the outside, and added classrooms this year; Laurel Bend has dug a well, added bathrooms, and done some remodeling and painting; Laurel Valley has torn down the old building and is in the process of erecting a new one; Little Creek has bought new furnishings for the sanctuary; Mt. Sheba has built a 40' by 80' two-story fellowship hall; Bull Creek, Calvary, Enon, Hot Springs, and Upper Laurel have growing building funds and are

contemplating the erection of new buildings.

The following churches have called pastors during the year: Bethel, Donald Gasperson; Davis Chapel, James White; Little Ivy, Ray Long; Laurel Bend, James Taffer; Laurel Branch, Rex Smith; Long Branch, Hansel Hensley; Madison Seminary, Thomas G. Hall; Marshall, Glen Whitley; Trinity, Homer Tomberlin. One month ago, every church in the association had a pastor. At the time of this writing six churches are without pastors.

Our association is blessed with an increasing number of qualified and dedicated pastors, many of them youthful, and they are worthy successors to the faithful ministers of other days. Also in the churches are increasing numbers of young men and women who are assuming places of leadership. May their numbers grow. With these and other hopeful signs, let us go forward, but let us not be at ease - no not in Zion. We must reach out redemptively in the spirit of Christ to those who need to know the Way, the Truth and the Life.

## AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists in the missionary task of sharing Christ with the whole world - a task which calls for the widest possible distribution of the Scriptures.

During 1971 the American Bible Society -

- distributed 90,129,921 Scriptures within the United States. This total reflects the continued growth and interest in the use of the Scriptures,
- supplied 53% of the 1971 United Bible Societies' World Service Budget, thereby providing over half of the 1971 world distribution total last year, 173 million Scriptures,
- presented Dr. Porter Routh the symbolic 25 millionth copy of "Good News for Modern Man". This small all-time best-selling paperback publication is now circulating in over 33 million copies. Other familiar Scripture versions, including King James Version and Revised Standard Version, continue to be published and circulated in large numbers,
- increased distribution of complete Bibles to members of the Armed Services through chaplains, reaching 54,490 copies for an increase of 33.3% over 1970,
- provided 747,131 Scriptures in special formats,
- published the Book of Job in Today's English Version to meet the January Bible Study needs of the Southern Baptist Convention,
- distributed through home missionaries of the Southern Baptist Convention over 300,000 Scriptures.

Southern Baptists consider the American Bible Society an essential part of their world-wide mission program and believe in the missionary importance of giving to the Society.

## EVANGELISM COMMITTEE REPORT

In reality this is a continuation of our Committee's report in 1971. Because of the small number of churches committing themselves to participate in the planned Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade September 12-18, our committee deemed it wise to reduce the number of places for services from three to two. Walnut Creek Church was chosen for the western section of the Association and Forks of Ivy for the eastern section.

Local pastors did the preaching. To give some general idea of the effectiveness of the Crusade, we offer some average figures secured by combining reports from the two groups: Attendance - 339 per night, pastors attending - 14, churches represented - 16. There were 16 rededications and 6 professions of faith. The offering amounted to \$318.87. All above expenses went to our Associational Missions Program.

Our committee planned an Associational Evangelism Rally for March 16, 1972, at Locust Grove Church. The Rev. Luther Osmont, area missionary for Western North Carolina, explained Lay Evangelism School. The Rev. Worth Emory, pastor of Ivy Hill Church preached on the importance of Evangelism. THE RECORD SPEAKS: Twenty-two people attended the Rally. All of these people were preachers or members

of preachers' families with the exception of one person.

Regarding the work of our State Department of Evangelism, they have trained a large number of pastors and others to lead Lay Evangelism Schools in Associations or groups of churches in an Association. Churches who participate in Lay Evangelism School must be firmly committed 9 months in advance of the date for the school. Any pastors and churches interested in a Lay Evangelism School are urged to contact the Evangelism Committee or the Associational Missionary who will work with the Evangelism Committee and the church or churches.

The materials used in Lay Evangelism Schools have been prepared by the Department of Evangelism, Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The next Statewide Evangelism Conference will be in Charlotte February 5-7, 1973. Such conferences are inspiring and worth your attendance.

After graduation from high school in 1957, Truman enrolled at Mars Hill College, but had to drop out after one semester. For thirteen years he fought against odds that would have defeated lesser men. When the doctors in the Baptist Hospital told him he had only a few months to live, he responded by enrolling in college for another semester. During his illness of 1959, he heard the call to serve God in a special way and dedicated himself to the ministry. He was ordained by the Forks of Ivey Baptist Church in November, 1960. This commitment gave him the strength and determination to keep on working to prepare himself to do the best job possible. When a college program seemed impossible, he entered Fruitland Institute and completed the training course for ministers in 1965. With temporary improvement in health, he returned to Mars Hill the following year and, inspite of repeated periods of hospitalization, completed his course and received an A. B. degree with a major in religion in May, 1970.

Feeling the urgency of time, Truman took up his work as a minister even while he was struggling to secure an education. After his ordination in 1960, he accepted a call from the Grandview Baptist Church in Madison county. He pastored four churches over the next thirteen years. Morgan Hill Baptist Church and Jupiter Baptist Church in Buncombe, and during his final years the Upper Laurel Baptist Church in Madison. In addition to his pastoral duties he took an active part in associational work, was much sought after as a preacher for revival meetings, and when Evangelist Graham came to Knoxville, he was asked to serve on the crusade committee.

In all of his work, and even in his sufferings, Truman was a happy person because he had overcome. He knew how to pray “not my will but thine be done” and to rest in the peace found in such surrender. He endeared himself to men, women, and children wherever he went and all who knew him were blessed by his spirit. He walked at ease with the young and the old, the educated and the untaught, the sophisticated and the humble because he was genuine—he was a man of integrity and of unwavering commitment to God.

On April 16, 1973 death came as the Great Liberator. His had been a life of continuous illness, involving more than eighty operations and, at the last, a loss of sight. For the tortured body “death was gain”, the beginning of a new life in which there will be no pain, no sorrow. Though hundreds will continue to miss him, no one could have wished him to stay.

# Constitution

1970

### ARTICLE I - Name

The name of this body shall be the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association.

### ARTICLE II - Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be:

1. To coordinate and promote fellowship and growth, missions, Christian education, and involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors.
2. To cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in Kingdom advancement.
3. The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association.

## ARTICLE III - Membership

### SECTION I. Member Churches

1. This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist churches in this general area that have been formally accepted as members and who continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association; by naming messengers to the annual meetings; and by reporting to such annual meetings on forms provided by the Association.

2. A church seeking admission to membership in the Association may make application in the following manner:

a. Decision to seek such admission shall have been determined by vote of the church in formal business session.

b. Copies of the Confession of Faith and the Covenant adopted by the church shall accompany the application.

c. Completed application shall be submitted to the Committee on Reception of New Members previous to the opening of an annual meeting of the Association.

3. The Committee on Reception of New Members shall report its findings to the Association on the first day of the annual session following its examination of any application. Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day, each church thus accepted will be enrolled as a member of the Association, and the moderator will extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers present.

4. Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another association or to remain unattached, it should proceed in the following manner:

a. Decision to withdraw shall have been determined in formal business session.

b. A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session should be submitted to the Moderator of the Association.

c. The Moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has towards the Association.

d. The committee shall report its findings to the Association in annual session, and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. The Association in annual session by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or when the church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association.

### SECTION II. Membership of the Annual Meetings of the Association

1. The elected officers of the Association, all pastors of member churches, and provided they are members of member churches, all persons reporting on any phase of the work of the Association, shall be EX OFFICIO members of the annual meetings.

2. Each member church is entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members above fifty, except that no church shall have more than ten messengers exclusive of the EX OFFICIO members designated above.

3. The EX OFFICIO members in attendance and the elected messengers presenting certification of their election by their churches shall constitute the official voting enrollment in any annual session.

## ARTICLE IV - Officers

### SECTION I. The Officers of the Association shall be:

1. Moderator, Vice moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of Missions (ex officio), Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, Director of Missions, and Director of Evangelism.

## SECTION II. Election of Officers:

1. The Moderator, Vice moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be elected as follows: the incumbent Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee; this committee shall present a slate of names to which may be added nominations from the floor. Such nominations shall be voted upon during the first session of the annual meeting.
2. The Missions Committee shall recommend a Superintendent of Missions when there is a vacancy; election shall be by majority vote of the Association, and for an indefinite period.
3. The Associational Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood shall select directors for their respective organizations, and recommend these persons to the Nominating Committee to be presented with the other nominees proposed for election.

## SECTION III. Terms of office shall be as follows:

1. All elected officers shall take office at the close of the last session of the annual associational meeting.
2. The duties of the Clerk serving during the current session are not ended, however, until the work of the session is completed and the minutes printed and distributed.
3. The Moderator may serve no more than four years consecutively.
4. All committee members appointed and elected in the annual session shall begin their work at the close of the annual meeting and continue through the next annual session of the Association.

## ARTICLE V - Executive Committee

SECTION I. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers named in Article IV, and one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, with the Moderator as Chairman.

SECTION II. The Moderator, Vice moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by the Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the Committee.

SECTION III. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

1. To act in behalf of the Association between annual meetings of the Association.
2. To carry out the plans laid at the annual session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the associational work.
3. No obligations to exceed \$500 may be undertaken by the Executive Committee on behalf of the Association, without specific authority from the Association.

## ARTICLE VI - Missions Committee

SECTION I. The Missions Committee shall be composed of a Director and eleven additional members recommended by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association in annual meeting. All mission work sponsored by the Association shall be under the supervision and direction of the Missions Committee.

SECTION II. Duties of the Missions Committee:

1. This Committee shall, when a vacancy occurs in the office of Superintendent of Missions, recommend a successor based upon the approved job description, to the annual meeting, or to a special called meeting of the Association.
2. It shall work in cooperation with the Director of Missions of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.
3. It shall supervise the activities of, and work with, the Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association.
4. It shall meet quarterly receiving written monthly reports from the Superintendent of Missions and make suggestions to him concerning the work of the Association.
5. It shall advise any group seeking to organize a mission or church.
6. It shall assist, upon request, churches with particular problems.
7. It shall maintain awareness of the mission needs of the churches in the Association and be ready to recommend ways in which these needs may be met.
8. It shall prepare and present a budget to the annual meeting of the Association.

SECTION III. The Missions Committee shall recommend to the Association for approval a job description for the Superintendent of Missions, who will serve as ex officio member of all committees.

## ARTICLE VII - Steering Committee

SECTION I. The Steering Committee shall be composed of the Vice Moderator as chairman, the pastors of the member churches, and two lay members elected by each church and named in the associational letter.

SECTION II. The responsibilities of the Steering Committee shall be:

1. To meet quarterly with the Executive Committee to consider the Kingdom work in the Association.
2. To assist in the promotion of the work of the Association in the churches.
3. To assist committee's reports in acquainting the churches with different phases of the work.

## ARTICLE VIII - Other Committees

SECTION I. The following committees shall be composed of three or more members each. They shall be appointed by the Moderator and the Committee on Committees, at the annual associational meeting, to serve in the ensuing year and for the next annual meeting.

SECTION II. Duties of these committees shall be:

1. Committee on Committees: to work with the Moderator in the annual session in the appointment of committees.
2. Nominating Committee: to nominate the associational officers and recommend to the Executive Committee replacements for vacancies occurring during the year. Nominees shall first have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.
3. Committee on Reports:
  - a. This committee shall inform our people about the work they have been chosen to represent and lead in promoting it.
  - b. They shall make brief written reports to the annual associational meeting.
  - c. This committee consists of a member for each of the following phases of work: Evangelism, Cooperative Program, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.
4. Program Committee:
  - a. This committee shall prepare a printed program for the annual associational meeting, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors.
  - b. This committee shall, in the opening meeting, present the printed program for adoption with necessary adjustments.
5. Committee on Places and Preachers:
  - a. This committee shall recommend the time and place or places for the next annual associational meeting.
  - b. This committee shall recommend the preachers and alternates for the Associational Sermon and the Missionary Sermon.
6. Constitutional Amendment Committee:
  - a. This committee shall consider and recommend changes in this Constitution which have been referred to them in the regular annual meeting.
  - b. This committee shall recommend changes in this Constitution that become necessary for clarity and for the proper functioning of the associational work.
7. Committee on Resolutions:
  - a. This committee shall consider and present to the annual associational meeting any resolutions referred to them.
  - b. They shall prepare and present any further resolutions deemed expedient to them.
8. Youth Committee:
  - a. This committee shall work with, in advisory capacity, the youth of the Association.
  - b. They shall promote programs that are of interest to the youth, such as music festivals, camps, retreats, study courses, fellowships, and the like.
9. Ordination Committee:
  - a. When so requested by a member church, they shall examine any candidate for the gospel ministry, in matters of life, doctrine, personal faith, cooperation, and any others relating to the ministerial call.

b. Upon approval, they shall recommend the ordination of this candidate.

10. Seminary Extension Committee: they shall promote and direct the Seminary Extension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director and Registrar annually. They shall appoint teachers in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for classes in this program.

#### ARTICLE IX - Annual Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be on Thursday and Friday following the first Sunday in August.

#### ARTICLE X - Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting on the second day.

#### ARTICLE XI - Parliamentary Authority

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned.

## Proceedings

The 166th annual associational meeting of the French Broad Baptist Association was called to order at 7:30 P.M. Thursday night August 9, 1973 at the Laurel Bend Baptist Church. Rev. Gordon Ball, Moderator called the meeting to order. Mrs. Dorothy Roberts, Associational Music Director presided during the song service, leading the congregation in singing Hymns "Amazing Grace and Shall We Gather at the River". Rev. H. L. Wilson brought the devotionals. Following the devotionals a roll call of the churches was made by the clerk. Visitors were recognized and two new pastors in our Association were introduced. They were Rev. Spencer LeGrande pastor of Marshall Church and Rev. Jack Burnette, Pastor of Forks of Ivy Church. The Program for the meeting was adopted with the understanding that necessary changes and corrections be made. The Messengers to the Association were seated.

The following reports were adopted:

Report no. 1 Digest of Church letters with the necessary corrections and changes when all of the church letters have been sent to the clerk.

Report no. 2 Executive committee report. Report no. 3 Stewardship

Report no. 4 State Home and Foreign Missions

Report no. 5 Cooperative program report

Report no. 6 Treasurers report

Report no. 7 was the appointment of committees and officers for the Association. Mr. Kendall moved the adoption of the report.

Mr. Wade Huey gave the Missions Committee Report. It was adopted.

Report no. 8. He also presented the budget for the coming year.

Report no. 9. Mr. Spencer LeGrande made the following motion in regard to the salary for the Superintendent of Missions. "I move that the mission committee be authorized to adjust the Associational Missionaries salary in accordance with the rise in cost of living of the funds become available from the churches during the next year. (Mr. LeGrande is pastor of the Marshall Baptist Church) Mr. Huey urges our churches to do more toward support of Associational Missions. The report (Budget) and the amendment were adopted.

During the business session these announcements were made. Rev. Spencer LeGrand announced the need for pastors and laymen to conduct the morning Devotions over radio station WMMH. Rev. Lester thanked all for attending the meeting in order to plan the work and discuss other meetings concerning the defeat of the Liquor by the drink Bill.

Rev. Sam O'Neal from the Baptist State Convention in Raleigh spoke urging churches to enroll their pastors in the Protection Plan offered by the convention for pastors.

Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the Congregation in singing, "Love Lifted Me". Following the hymn, Rev. James Taffer brought the evening message using Luke 16 as his text. Mr. Taffer, pastor of the Laurel Bend Baptist Church brought a very inspiring message which was enjoyed by all.

On Friday Morning August 10, 1973 the second session of the 166th annual meeting of the French Broad Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. Gordon Ball. The meeting was held with the Upper Laurel Baptist Church. Following a song service led by Mrs. Dorothy Roberts, Rev. Jess Slagle pastor of the Big Laurel Baptist Church brought the Devotionals using as his thought "We are Laborers together with God".

Sunday School Report adopted, no. 10. Church Training report adopted, no. 11. Brotherhood report adopted, no. 12. WMU report no. 13 adopted. VBS report, no. 14 adopted. Church Libraries report was adopted, no. 15. Miss Sue Fitzgerald gave the Christian Education report. It was adopted, no. 16. Dr. Bud Smith president of Wingate College spoke to her report. Dr. Smith spoke concerning the part Christian higher education has in the development of young men and women's Christian Character. A question was asked by a young lady present about the spiritual life of the students on our college campuses. Dr. Smith, Mrs. Smith and Dr. Evelyn Underwood spoke about the spiritual help and encouragement given to the students, both individual and collective.

Report no. 17 was read by Miss Sadie Wallin. Report from Cambell College adopted.

Visitors to our annual meeting were recognized. Woodrow Hill, representative of the Biblical Recorder, state Baptist paper spoke.

Music report, no. 18 was adopted. Report no. 19. Seminary extension report adopted.

Following a congregational hymn some of our churches gave progress reports. Mr. Hogan, pastor of Calvary Baptist church reported on the progress of the new building. Youth work had been started with a week spent at Caswell. Mrs. Franklin from the Chapel Hill Church reported on their building renovation, revival and Bible School work. Rev. Joe Honeycutt Pastor of Alexander Church told about their youth work, visitation in rest homes, building a fellowship hall. Ben Lee Honeycutt, pastor of Oak Ridge Church reported 20 or 25 baptisms during the year. Mr. Taffer, pastor of Laurel Bend reported a visitation program started by young people in the community. New carpet for the church and new pews had been bought, also some land for a cemetery. Mrs. Moore from the Hot Springs Church said they were planning to build a new sanctuary and requested prayers for them and the work at Hot Springs. Vance Edwards from Trinity reported a Bible School planned with not enough children, but interested workers gathered enough children to have 32 in attendance. The building program was still in progress. Rev. Orlando Hawkins pastor of Gabriels Creek Baptist Church spoke about the Youth Choir, new organ and other work of the church. Rev. Kendall from the Piney Mountain Church spoke about their choir and the improvements made on the building throughout the years. Rev. Spencer LeGrande of the Marshall church spoke concerning their Youth Revival held by students from the Baptists colleges. 4 young men made professions of faith. A lay witnessing program was organized. Rev. Gasperson from the Bethel Baptist Church reported progress in their church with rotating deacons, and some building improvements made. Rev. Rogers from the Upper Laurel Church is a new pastor so he is looking forward to this year as a pastor of the church and as a pastor in our Association. Mr. Jenkins reported the progress made in the California Creek Baptist Church.

Following these reports a business session was held with the first order of business being the following motion made by Mr. Kenneth Pike. "I move that the 1973 Associational minutes of the French Broad Baptist Association be dedicated to Rev. Truman Fisher." Motion carried and the historian was asked to write the dedication.

Report no. 20, the Baptist Children's home report was adopted. Mr. Clyde Morris, director of the Home for Unwed Mothers in WNC, spoke to the report. He reported 4 cottages in use now at the Broyhill home on Western North Carolina. Report no. 21, Home for the Aging was adopted. Mr. Plemmons spoke to the report requesting that we join him in prayer for a Baptist Home for the Aging in Western North Carolina.

N.C. Baptist Hospital report was adopted, report no. 22. Rev. Calvin Knight spoke to the report. The Baptist Foundation was reported to be an institution of love, whereby gifts & funds which come to Baptist institutions are managed in such a way as to be very beneficial to all. We all need to be more aware of this part of our Baptist Program.

Report no. 23, Civic Righteousness was given by Mrs. Franklin. Report adopted. Rev. Nane Starnes spoke to the report, urging all christians and churches to put forth every effort to defeat the Liquor by the drink bill. An offering was made for the Christian Action League to support efforts to defeat the bill.

The morning message was brought by the Rev. Joe Honeycutt, pastor of Alexander Baptist Church. His text was "Be Ye Steadfast" taken from I Corinthians 15: ver. 57-58. Adjournment for lunch which was served by the ladies of the Upper Laurel Church.

Following a delicious lunch and much pleasant conversation and fellowship, the afternoon session was called to order by Bruce Phillips, Vice-Moderator. Rev. Rogers, pastor of the Upper Laurel gave the devotions.

The annuity report, no. 24 was adopted. Report no. 25, Associational Missions report was adopted. Mr. Jenkins spoke concerning the World Missions Conference to be held in our Association in October. Miss Nancy Knight spoke concerning the work in Spillcorn.

Dr. Underwood moved the adoption of the Historians report. Adopted, no. 26.

Baptist Periodicals Report was adopted. No. 27. American Bible Society report adopted, no. 28. Report no. 29, evangelism Committee report adopted. Committee on Reports was no. 30, adopted. Committee on Places, preachers report was adopted, no. 31. The resolutions committee report was adopted, no. 32.

During the afternoon business session Mr. Jenkins reported that some wanted a change of meeting days for the annual associational meeting. Moderator requested this issue be put to the steering committee for church opinion. He referred the question to the steering committee.

The matter of Trustees for the Association was brought up. Mr. M. H. Kendall made the following motion and it passed. "I move that the Executive Committee discuss the election and duration of the service of trustees. After a decision has been reached, turn the matter over to the Constitutional Amendment Committee for an addition to the Constitution."

The amount of the morning offering was 110.45. This was to go to the Christian Action League to be used for the defeat of the Liquor by the drink Bill. It was announced that many of our churches had already contributed.

Mr. Jenkins expressed his appreciation to the churches for the hospitality and for the delicious meal served by the Upper Laurel Church.

In memory of Our Beloved dead was held by the clerk. Following Mr. Ralph Hogan announced a memorial for Rev. Truman Fisher had been established by the Pastors Conference. This was to go to the Kidney Foundation.

Meeting adjourned.

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The first Executive Committee Meeting of 1972-1973 Associational year was held at the office of Mr. Jenkins on September 3, 1972. Mr. Owen Fish of the Belva Baptist Church was appointed to serve on the Executive Committee and Mr. Clell Fisher, pastor of the Locust Grove Church, was also appointed. The budget was discussed with the question—How much money could each organization spend? Mrs. Robinson read the list of WMU Officers and these were approved. Mr. Huey requested Mr. Ball to appoint a new member to serve on the Committee to search a home site for the Supt. of Missions. During the business session the question regarding Mr. Halls motion (made at the annual Association) to carry over the vote on the church-college relation committee was discussed. A motion was made that the ruling made by the Moderator stand as ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER state - then ask the Constitutional Amendment Committee to clarify Amendment No. 10. Mr. Keller seconded Mrs. Roberts motion. A discussion followed. Mr. Phillips stated - since the committee could not reach a decision he would make a substitute motion. "The Executive Committee takes the position that the entire proceeding to amend our Constitution was incorrect in its method of approach as the letter of the Constitution now reads as printed in the Book of Reports of the French Broad Association of 1972 - Article 10. There was an error in the printing of the Constitution as it appeared in the 1971 Minutes of the French Broad Association. Our method of amending the Constitution should be revised and clarified at our next session in regard to Article 10. There was an 8 to 1 vote so motion carried.

The clerk was to use her best judgement as to which press printed the Associational Minutes.

The Executive Committee met on Sunday, April 8, 1973 at the Mars Hill Baptist Church with 7 members present. The Committee approved the appointment of Kenneth Pike as Director of Church Training. The following reports were given:

1. Steering Committee report - Bruce Phillips. 2. Mr. Hogan reported on the Laymen's retreat, reporting a good attendance and a very good meeting. 3. Mr. Pike announced a Church Training Workshop conducted by State Church Training Leaders. Maurice Cooper will lead the Workshop to be held at Madison Seminary Church, April 30. 4. Mr. Huet reported a good response to the World Missions Conference to be held in October, 1973. He also reported a deficit in the Associational treasury. Following the reports the clerk read a letter from the Fosters Creek Baptist Church requesting their withdrawal from the French Broad Association. This matter was turned over to the Moderator who will appoint a Committee to confer with the church.

The Executive Committee met on July 8, 1973 at the Mars Hill Baptist Church with 9 members present. The treasurer reported all bills were paid and there was a small surplus in the treasury. Mr. Huey reported that Nancy Knight would be coming to work at Spillcorn on July 16. He also reported that work here was not progressing as well as it should. Mrs. Robinson reported the Annie Armstrong Offering to be \$4639.00 and that mission concern and mission activities are experiencing a new growth in our Association.

Mr. Hogan reported a very successful men and boys camp. There are also 2 new Men's organizations in our Association - one at Forks of Ivy and the other at California Creek. Mr. Jenkins announced the 5th Sunday Hymn Sing at the Trinity Church. He also said that plans for the World Missions Conference were moving ahead. The picnic for Pastors families and Executive Committee and families was announced for July 16, 1973 at the Ivy Hill Church Fellowship Building.

Motion was made to let the Nominating Committee also serve as Committee on Committees this year and ask the Committee to appoint a new Committee on Committees to serve during the next associational year.

## STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Webster defines a steward as "One employed in a large household or estate to manage domestic concerns including supervision of servants, collection of rents, and keeping of accounts." Christian stewardship includes life as a trust from God and the believer's relationship to material things as God's managers.

In a narrower sense, we use the word, stewardship, with regard to how much of the goods we manage in support of our families, to do it for God's glory, as we are with regard to what we give through the church.

The apostle Paul gave us a principle of sharing in II Corinthians 9:7-8: "He that soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he that soweth bountifully shall reap bountifully. Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver.

In 1971, Southern Baptists gave through their churches for all causes the sum of \$900,000,000, a per capita gift of \$75.00. One-fifth of these contributions was to all causes outside local church expenses, or a per capita gift of \$15.00 for all missions, education, and benevolences.

Many of the people in our churches in this Association are giving sacrificially, while others are doing far less than they are able. We appeal for more of our people to share worthily in the support of Christ's kingdom in its worldwide ministry.

## STATE HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

The best way to say State-Home-Foreign missions is "Cooperative Program. Through this cooperative fellowship we share the Word to 100,000 pupils in 821 Christian schools. We serve 1,100,000 patients through 21 Baptist hospitals and 105 clinics. We also minister to 8,000 homeless children and 2,300 elderly people with shelter, food, clothing, etc., in 21 homes and orphanages. This work is done through more than 6,000 missionaries who in turn or also baptized 66,000 people last year.

The Home Mission work alone is done through 2,200 full time missionaries; 600 special workers (such as summer missionaries), 900 chaplains, with 1,000 missionaries involved in language missions. There are 250 persons working in Christian social ministries with 400 pastors receiving pastoral aid.

State Ministries consist of 45 statewide ministries such as Fruitland Bible Institute; Church Loans; Pastoral Aid; Ministry to the Deaf; Seminary Extension; Evangelism and ministries to the General Baptist Denomination, etc.

Foreign Missions are serving in 76 countries by 2,520 missionary personnel under appointment in 42 categories of service. Career appointments 1933-70 totaled 3,045. Of this number 2,168 are still in service. There are 296 missionaries serving through auxiliary categories: journeymen, associates and special project personnel. Between 250 and 300 new foreign missionary candidates are needed. They must come from OUR homes, OUR families. Now is the time to send as many missionaries throughout the world as possible. The Lord demands it, world conditions demand it; the Gospel itself demands it.

State Home and Foreign Missions are NOT programs of duplication but rather cooperative ministries which reflect the best stewardship of Baptist money. We must proclaim throughout the world the Gospel of Christ.

## VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

Did you know this year the VBS enrollment was well over three million. The two weeks of VBS is equivalent to seven months of Sunday School. More training is received than in Training Union and more mission work is taught than in WMU and Brotherhood combined. Money received through VBS totaled enough to keep 80 missionaries on the foreign mission field each year. Thousands of missionaries, pastors and others now serving in church vocation heard God call in VBS. There were about 50,000 youths who received Christ as their Savior in VBS. There were 1,000,000 unchurched prospects discovered through VBS this year. And approximately 100,000 VBS workers trained and led our young people to these great goals.

The French Broad Association shows over 43 of our churches having a VBS with the following average enrollment of 2,088, approximately 630 teachers teaching God's word: an average offer-

ing of \$6,570 for the Cooperative Program. The total offering was over \$3,000, with 54 professions of faith. To God be the glory this is an achievement worth rejoicing about.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

How many of you have ever visited one of our seven colleges: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest, Wingate? No matter where you visit the school is in a building program, putting up impressive buildings. I look at the new buildings and the new walls that will soon be completed and am awed by the thought of our young people who have the opportunity of a college education in one of our schools. But walls do not assure a student of an education. Walls are necessary, but many classrooms on our campuses are without walls. Jesus taught in classrooms without walls - on a mountain side, in a fishing boat, beside the sea, at the dinner table, or as he walked down the road. This was not new with Jesus for in Deuteronomy we see parents admonished to teacher as they walk in the way, sit in their home, lie down or rise up. Why did the Hebrew family feel it was so important to teach all the time? Why did Jesus teach wherever he was? Why do our colleges teach in classes with and without walls? Why does Mars Hill have a pamphlet entitled, "Classrooms Without Walls"? The reason is simple. All three are concerned about the whole person, the whole person in relation to God. Jesus was teaching the truth about God and man's relation to God. This truth about God and man is what makes a Christian College unique. In an article "What Makes a Christian College Unique" Chevis Horne says: "The Christian College teaches the whole truth, to whole persons, through whole men." And this sort of teaching cannot be done in walled classrooms alone. Dr. Bentley in a speech last winter to our college community said: . . . the corner stone to the success of this college lies in the deep sustaining religious commitment on which the school was founded. . . Mars Hill College as a Christian Institution embraces the principle that the Christian Faith provides man with the highest dimension to understanding or self-awareness, and it provides us with the highest motive in life, this is, to develop our God given talents in service to Him with and for our fellowman." Walled classrooms cannot contain all of the teaching necessary to help a person toward a maturing faith that will enable him to serve God wherever he is. Yes, it does take the regular classrooms but it also takes wide experiences spiritually and mentally on campus, in our churches and communities. It takes service learning projects. It takes wide relationships with young and old. A recent visiting speaker on the campus called Mars Hill a "servant leader." I like this description of a Christian school, for our schools should be servants of God and man as well as leaders.

I am thankful for the colleges we support. We can help them as they seek to be "servant leaders"

through our prayers, through the Cooperative Program, through the Father's Day offering that goes for scholarship. We can help in another way as colleges seek to teach the whole truth in classrooms with and without walls by our teaching of the truth in our homes as we walk in the way, as we sit down, as we lie down and as we rise up.

## BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

In May of this year Baptist Hospital observed its 50th Anniversary. It was celebrated jointly with the dedication of the new Reynolds Tower, a 16 story patient care facility. The total bed capacity is now 655, placing Baptist Hospital within the top 10 percent (in size) among hospitals in America.

Last November the Baptist State Convention heard the report of the Committee of 15 and adopted its recommendations. The hospital has been seeking to implement these recommendations.

The hospital's financial operation is "in the black" and there has not been a general room rate increase in 2 1/2 years. As of this date, the Mother's Day Offerings are running ahead of last year.

Thirty seven churches of the French Broad Association have given to the Mother's Day offering as of June. We are not doing as well this year as last year, when \$3,457.26 had been given by 41 churches. As of June, thirty-seven churches have given \$3,261.63. We each one need to check and see if our church has given and to make sure our commitment is as great if not greater than last year.

## CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS REPORT

I can think of no other civic problem facing us today greater than alcoholism. It is listed as the number one drug. I would like to quote some statistics to prove this statement: America has 9 million chronic alcoholics. Approximately 200,000 new cases of alcoholism occur every year. Of the 50,000 Americans killed in traffic accidents annually, 28,400 have alcohol in their blood at the time of the accident. There are 2,000,000 arrests annually for public drunkenness, Americans spend 21 billion dollars for alcohol last year. One third of all suicides are alcohol related. Life expectancy among alcoholics decreases 10 to 12 years. Nearly one third of all cases handled in child guidance centers show one or both parents are involved with chronic alcoholism.

Dr. Higbee, Superintendent of Alcoholic Rehabilitation Center at Swannanoa, North Carolina says that alcoholism is not a disease, "It is just a bad habit." If this is true then we have a great responsibility to prevent liquor from being so conveniently gotten as will be if the Liquor-by-the-Drink Referendum should pass. As Christian citizens look at this issue, surely they can see the need to pray much and work hard to defeat this referendum.

To put liquor in individual hands for control, to let profit be the motive, to have 3324 outlets instead of 324 next year, is to increase liquor consumption, more alcoholics, more highway deaths, more crippled and maimed people, more broken homes, more hungry and defeated children.

The big question is: Do you want to see the increased drinking with all the problems and dangers it produces unleashed on our state and on your loved ones?

The magazine "Listen", a journal of better living, reports that youngsters are turning to alcohol. It reports, "Alcoholics Anonymous says it has members as young as 10! The American Medical Association reports that 1 in every 15 teen-agers will turn into alcoholics."

Many times we think that others can keep bad and unwanted things from happening to our community of people but the older I get the more I see my responsibility as a Christian and as a citizen in civic matters. Yes it is my duty to God to be my brothers keeper to stand for good and oppose corruptness.

You have a duty too!

## ANNUITY REPORT

The Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention this year added new benefits for most active and retired pastors, church staff members and denominational workers it serves.

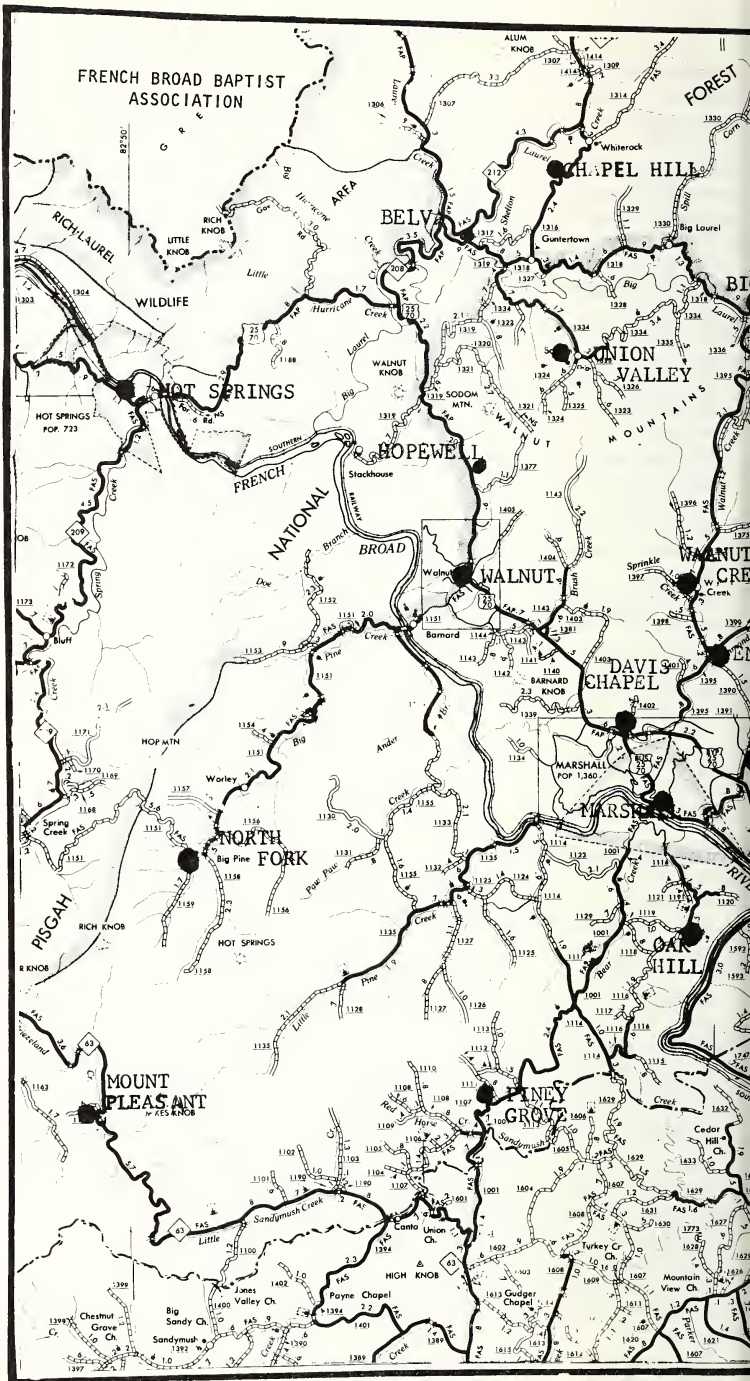
For annuitants (retirees, widows, and disabled persons) on the roll December 31, 1972, monthly income checks have been permanently increased by 6 per cent. Just before Christmas, 1972, more than 7,000 annuitants received "13th checks" amounting to the size of two extra months' benefits. The "13th Checks" are paid in addition to the regular monthly payments.

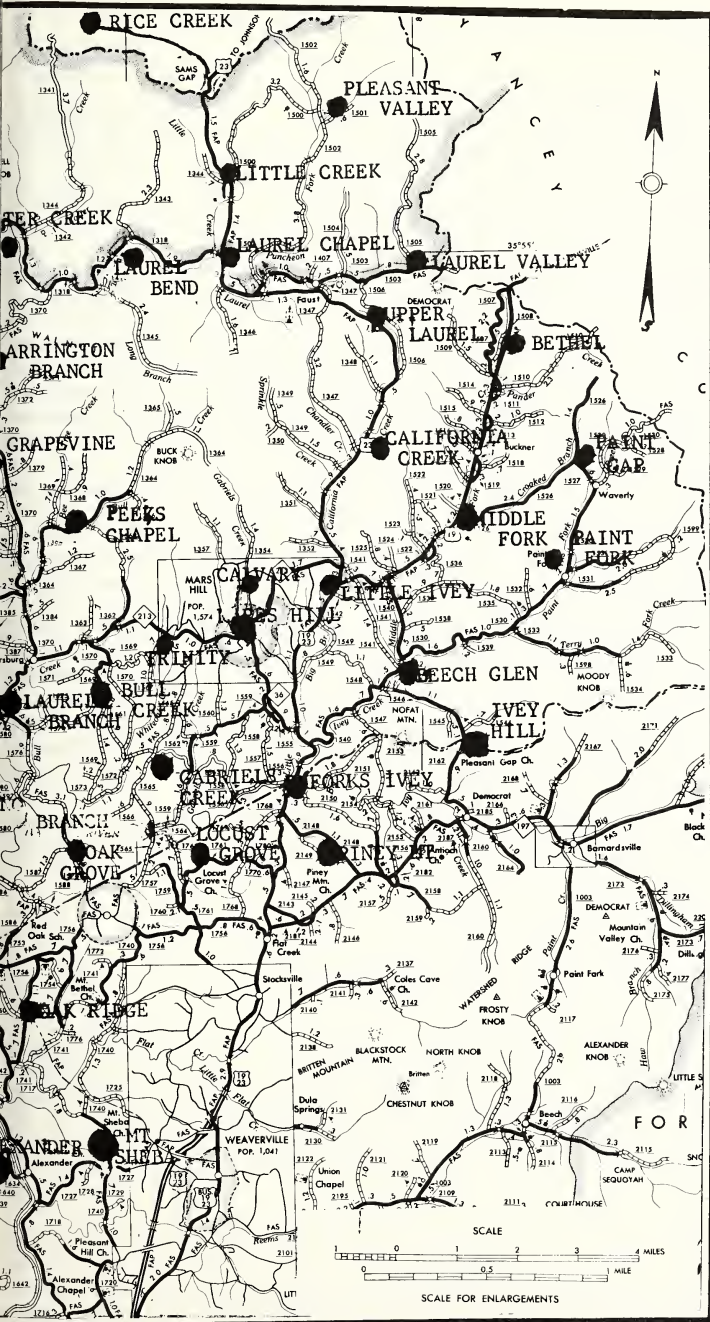
Participants in Plans A-10, A-11 and A-25 on January 1, 1973 had their accrued credits increased by 10 percent in "good experience credit," and Plan B participants received an additional interest credit based on the Board's good experience on its investments. In addition, the Board approved (subject to action by state convention) an increase in widow benefits under Plan A to 50 per cent of the potential or actual retirement benefit; previously it was 40 per cent. This increase applies to those retiring January 1, 1973 and thereafter.

At the same time, a temporary income benefit under Plan A was established for a widow, child or dependent parent of those who die before early or normal retirement, or after disability retirement, and who have met the required participation. The temporary income benefit can amount, at maximum, to \$333.33 per month for 36 months (or a total of \$12,000) if the participant died before age 40. The length of payment of the benefit decreased with the age at death. This benefit is payable to those who died January 1, 1973 or thereafter.

More than 9,000 insurance policy holders transferred from the previous Health Benefit Plan with Blue Cross-Blue Shield to the new plan begun January 1, 1973 with Aetna Life Insurance Company.

The Board reported several records for its operations in 1972. Funds held in trust for over 38,000 participants in retirement plans passed \$300 million for the first. Investment income

reached a new high for 1972 of more than \$22 million. Retirement and other protection benefits paid out for the 12 month period surpassed 10 million dollars for the first time.

The total amount of money paid in "13th Checks" exceeded one million dollars, also for the first time. Good investment results in 1972 on funds held to pay benefit account for this dividend.

Income from premiums and dues topped \$30 million, another record.

Results: New organizations 9, Conversions 78, New Church members 16, State, Regional, and Southwide meetings 13.

The spiritual climate of our associations will continue to be greatly improved when we develop those we win to a full Divine Human partnership with Christ-like concern for a sin sick, world. (II Cor. 3:18)

## HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In 1807 Little Ivey, Locust Old Fields, and New Found churches from the Holston Association in Tennessee joined with French Broad, Cane River, and Cane Creek churches from the Broad River Association in South Carolina to form the French Broad Association. As more people moved into the mountain area new churches were added, among them Bull Creek, River Hill, Flat Creek, Grassy Creek, Middle Fork, Big Ivey, Roan Mountain, Hominy, Old Salem, and Berla. Along with this growth in numbers, the churches sought to improve the quality of their ministry. There were times of disagreement and division in the Association but inspite of these, the Kingdom's work moved forward.

Through the years many changes have been made in the Association and in its work. Three new Associations were formed from territory originally included in the French Broad: Salem, Roan Mountain, and New Found associations. More important than these physical changes, however, were the innovations in organization as Sunday Schools were added, then the Training Union (called the B.Y.P.U. during the early years) and the Women's Missionary Union and its auxiliaries

for the young people. The churches moved in obedience to the Lord's Command to preach, to teach, and to heal first in Jerusalem and then to the uttermost parts of the earth. Annual reports of the churches and of the Association reveal a steady, if slow at times, enlargement of vision and a continued faithfulness to the Great Commission.

In 1972 the North Carolina Convention asked all churches to set a goal of 10 per cent advance in baptisms, in Sunday School enrollment, in giving through the cooperative program, and in associational mission support. The French Broad has not reached that goal on all points this year, but some significant gains have been made. When this report was written, eight churches that reported last year had not yet presented association letters, so there cannot be a precise accounting. From balancing the reports, however, it seems that there have not been any losses and that important gains have been made in some areas. In 1972 the churches reported 203 baptisms; this year the record to date is 174, but this does not include the figures from eight churches which are included in the first figure. Those eight churches accounted for 49 baptism last year. Last year the annual reports listed 4,499 enlisted in Sunday School; this year's report gives 3,599 but the eight churches not included will make up more than the 900 difference. Checking the churches for losses in enrollment against the gains in other seems to indicate a figure equal to that given in 1972. Last year the churches gave \$20,116.00 through the cooperative program; this year the incomplete figures are \$20,565.00. Of the eight churches not yet recorded, 4 gave last year an amount that would make the increase this year about %1000.00 or more. One church that did not give through the cooperative program last year has listed offerings this year. Some churches in the association have been very generous in their gifts to the program. Hot Springs church gave \$16.60 per person; Walnut gave \$9.00 per person; and Belva gave \$6.00 per person. Others did equally well.

The greatest gain in giving last year was in the offerings for missions, and especially in the gifts for home and foreign missions at Christmas and Easter. In 1972 the churches gave a total of \$74,445.00 for mission; in 1973, \$78,975.00 and this figure does not include the gifts of the eight churches not reporting. It seems that the association has almost reached the 10 percent goal in this area of work. For special offerings the record exceeds the 10 percent goal for foreign missions and exceeds a 15 per cent increase for home missions. Both offerings were the largest in the history of the association.

In addition to the increase in support for missions, individual churches helped to pay the expenses of 18 men and women to go to Twin Falls, Idaho, in October to construct a building for a church which has been meeting in the home of the pastor for years. Since that time a number of churches have raised to date \$5,000.00 to help build a mission church at Jackpot, Nevada. When sufficient funds for materials have been raised, another group of people will go to Nevada to build that structure so the worship and training services can be moved from the casino to better quarters. Many churches in the association have given generously to support projects in their local communities when needs have arisen.

In reviewing the work of the association for this past year there are no spectacular movements or events to report, but one feature of the work is significant. A constructive foundation continues to be laid for a sound program of church work. Study and training have been an important part of the year's record. Five workshops in Church Training were held in two separate locations and at two different dates. During the first week in January a full team from the association attended a Vacation Bible School clinic at Wingate College and in April Association clinics were held at Walnut and California Creek churches. As a result of these training sessions a greater number of churches have been able to plan and conduct their own Vacation Bible Schools this summer.

In January nine churches conducted a week of Bible study for the entire membership. Five courses in Bible study and church training were offered through the Seminary Extension Service during the fall of 1972 and again in the spring of 1973. These were well attended. Church members are reading more of our denominational literature. One church, Upper Laurel, has the Biblical Recorder in every home. When men study the Bible and seek to learn better ways to serve through the church, the work of the Kingdom will continue to advance.

The fact that a growing number of churches have adopted budgets for their programs and that many are writing constitutions for the first time is another sign of a mature, sound program. An increasing number of able, dedicated, and trained pastors are providing strong leadership in religious education and missions, and this work is bringing improvements in all aspects of the work. Churches are no longer satisfied when they conduct an annual revival; they know that new born Christians must be nurtured and trained in the way of the Lord.

Other innovations and improvements are being made throughout the Association. A number of churches have started bus ministries in order to serve wider areas. Three groups of young people have been sent to state-wide camps for training this summer. The radio ministry has been expanded to include one half-hour program (paid for by Dan Young, pastor of Mt. Sheba Church) each day at 10:30, a 15 minute devotional program daily at 8:45, and 43 an hour program each Sunday evening at 6:00. This last is a replay of the morning service at the Mars Hill Baptist Church, but the other two are open for the participation of all churches.

A number of churches have building programs in the planning stages. Calvery will soon have a new home. Hot Springs, Belva, and California Creek churches are planning for new buildings in the near future. Hot Springs congregation of 59 members has raised \$10,000.00 toward its building program this year through its regular weekly offerings. The Belva Church has received some material as a gift, and the members are raising "patches of tobacco for the building" this summer. California Creek members have raised \$9,000.00 toward their project. A large number of churches have made improvements on their present facilities. Grapevine has added Sunday School rooms. Laurel Chapel Church and Chaple Hill Church have veneered their buildings with brick, and Pleasant Valley has covered its building with white aluminum siding. Pleasant Valley has also bought new carpeting and reworked the pews. Trinity has installed a new baptistry and two complete restrooms and a water system. Ivey Hill has new carpeting, new pews, and a new pulpit furniture. Laurel Bend Church has repainted the inside of the church and added new carpeting, pews, and pulpit furniture. Grandview has laid carpeting in the sanctuary and adult ladies class room. Upper Laurel has new carpeting for the sanctuary. Little Ivey has a new ceiling in the sanctuary, Paint Fork has a new piano; and Gabriels Creek has a new organ; and Forks of Ivey has a new organ. Little Creek has installed new bathrooms, bought pews, and ordered carpeting for the sanctuary. Union Valley has redone the inside of their church with birch paneling.

There have been five ministers ordained by churches in the Association this year: Rex Smith, by Laurel Branch Church; Paul Riddle, by the Pleasant Valley Church; Jimmy Buckner, by the Walnut Church; Garland Rice, by the Big Laurel Baptist Church and Sue Fitzgerald, by Mars Hill Church.

Two new pastors have come to serve churches in the Association this year: Rev. Spencer Legrand to the church in Marshall and Rev. Jack Barnett to the Forks of Ivey Church. The Association has lost one pastor by death, Rev. Truman Fisher. Four churches are without pastors at the time: Upper Laurel, Laurel Valley, Enon, and Laurel Branch.

## BAPTIST CHURCH LITERATURE

The Southern Baptist Convention has one of the largest publishing companies in the world. Trainloads of Sunday School literature go out from Nashville, Tennessee each quarter of the year to supply SBC churches with quarterlies to aid in the weekly Bible study. Our denomination is noted for more than the quantity of its publishing it is recognized for quality. Southern Baptist literature is recognized as among the best religious literature ever developed. Other denominations have recognized this quality and are regularly using our Baptist leaders as consultants to advise them in their publishing business. They also purchase a great deal of our literature.

But the greatest proof of the superiority of Southern Baptist literature is found in its content and in its effect upon the people who use it. All Southern Baptist literature is based upon the New Testament outreach - "For the Son of Man is come to seek and save that which was lost" (Luke 19:10) This unity of purpose coordinates all the divisions of Activity in the church. The Sunday School and the Men's Brotherhood are both concerned with the same mission. In the states where the Southern Baptists Church predominates one finds the largest number of people reading and studying the Bible. This area is often referred to as "The Bible Belt". The Southern Baptist Convention never plans for the addition of new department or for emphasis in their work without first preparing for the suitable amount of literature to motivate and undergird the new area of work. Every organization in the SBC has a full complement of literature to support a vital program in any individual church.

Individual Baptist Churches and Church members will find the same key to success if they will always provide and use the SBC literature for motivation and support of their church activities. Space does not permit the naming of all these publications. They are innumerable. Every church should secure the catalog listing this material so that any organization could consult it for information.

French Broad Baptist Churches should certainly want:

- THE COMMISSION - monthly magazine on World Missions
- THE ROYAL SERVICE - WMU programmed material on World Missions.
- HOME MISSIONS - a monthly magazine on Mission Work in the United States.
- THE BROTHERHOOD MAGAZINE - Mission Action by the men of the church.
- BIBLE STUDY TEXTS - for the January Bible Study for ages 6 to 98.
- TRAINING UNION LITERATURE - for all ages 6 to 98.
- SUNDAY SCHOOL LITERATURE - graded literature where it is possible, uniform lessons for smaller Sunday Schools.
- VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL LITERATURE - to be studied by the adults in April and May. To be used by the young people in June and July.
- MISSION STUDY BOOKS - for study of World Missions during November and December. For study of Home Missions during March and April.
- THE BIBLICAL RECORDER - a weekly magazine published by the North Carolina Baptist Convention. It keeps Baptists informed about what the churches in the state are doing.
- CHARITY AND CHILDREN - a weekly newspaper about the activities in the North Carolina Children's Homes supported by Baptists.

Most of the churches in the French Broad Association are using the Sunday School and Training Union Literature with great success. If more of the mission literature such as The Commission, The Royal Service, Home Missions, and the Brotherhood magazines could be used by the churches, they would achieve a strong progressive mission program. A strong mission program makes a live church.

Every church member should read the literature that will help him develop as a Christian and understand how his work relates to that of other Baptists in the state; will also motivate a person to more action and more appreciation for his church.

This literature is not designed to replace the Bible, but is designed to motivate a person to more action and more appreciation for his Bible, Church, and Christ.

## AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

During 1972 the American Bible Society:

- distributed 121,122,596 copies of Scripture within the United States.

- continued to publish and distribute thousands of copies of Scripture in other familiar versions.
- provided 704,849 copies of Scripture for the blind.
- opened a new Southern regional distribution office in Atlanta, Georgia.
- provided and distributed 2,196,844 copies of Scripture at Explo '72 during June, 1972 in Dallas, Texas.

During these past six years Southern Baptists have led all other denominations in their gifts to the American Bible Society; and through these gifts, churches show their deep and continued interest in providing the Word of God for people everywhere.

## EVANGELISM COMMITTEE REPORT

There is no joy in writing this report. It contains no record of accomplishment during the year just passed. The Committee, and particularly the Chairman, must bear part of the responsibility through inadequate leadership. However, part of the responsibility rests upon the constituency the churches of the French Broad Association along with their local leadership.

One paragraph in our 1972 report is hereby copied verbatim. "Regarding the work of our State Department of Evangelism, they have trained a large number of pastors and others to lead Lay Evangelism Schools in Associations or groups of churches in an association. Churches who participate in Lay Evangelism Schools must be firmly committed 9 months in advance of the date for the school. Any pastors and churches interested in a Lay Evangelism School are urged to contact the Evangelism Committee or the Associational Missionary who will work with the Evangelism Committee and the church or churches."

Not one person showed enough interest in a Lay Evangelism School to even contact the chairman of the Evangelism Committee. This help is still available. But it cannot be secured for next week or next month. Planning for a Lay Evangelism School for November 1974 should begin NOW!

The annual Statewide Evangelism Conference will be a War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, February 4-6, 1974. Pastors and lay people can profit through attending this Conference.

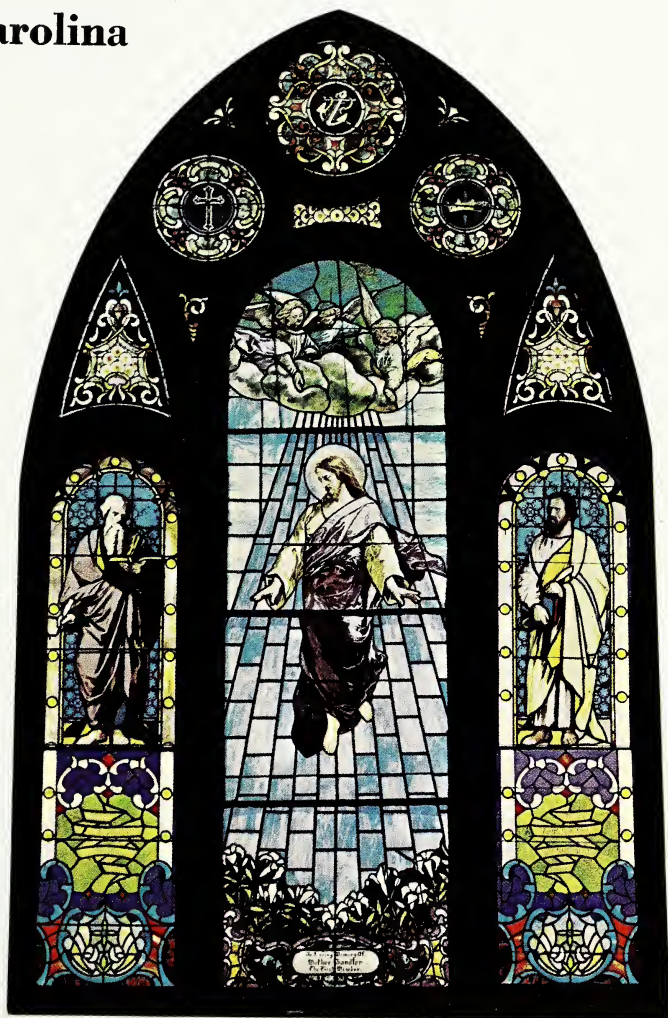

# Constitution

1974

## ARTICLE I—Name

The name of this body shall be the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association.

## ARTICLE II—Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be:

1. To coordinate and promote fellowship and growth, missions, Christian education, and involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors.
2. To cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in Kingdom advancement.
3. The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association.

## ARTICLE III—Membership

### SECTION I. Member Churches

1. This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches in this general area that have been formally accepted as members and who continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association; by naming messengers to the annual meetings; and by reporting to such annual meetings on forms provided by the Association.
2. A church seeking admission to membership in the Association may make application in the following manner:
  - a. Decision to seek such admission shall have been determined by vote of the church in formal business session.
  - b. Copies of the Confession of Faith and the Covenant adopted by the church shall accompany the application.
  - c. Completed application shall be submitted to the Committee on Reception of New Members previous to the opening of an annual meeting of the Association.
3. The Committee on Reception of New Members shall report its findings to the Association on the first day of the annual session following its examination of any application. Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day, each church thus accepted will be enrolled as a member of the Association, and the moderator will extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers present.
4. Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another association or to remain unattached, it should proceed in the following manner:
  - a. Decision to withdraw shall have been determined in formal business session.
  - b. A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session should be submitted to the Moderator of the Association.
  - c. The Moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has towards the Association.

d. The committee shall report its findings to the Association in annual session and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. The Association in annual session by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or when the church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association.

## SECTION II. Membership of the Annual Meetings of the Association

1. The elected officers of the Association, all pastors of member churches, and provided they are members of member churches, all persons reporting on any phase of the work of the Association, shall be EX OFFICIO members of the annual meetings.

2. Each member church is entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members above fifty, except that no church shall have more than ten messengers exclusive of the EX OFFICIO members designated above.

3. The EX OFFICIO members in attendance and the elected messengers presenting certification of their election by their churches shall constitute the official voting enrollment in any annual session.

## ARTICLE IV—Officers

### SECTION I. The Officers of the Association shall be:

1. Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of Missions (ex officio), Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, Director of Missions, and Director of Evangelism.

### SECTION II. Election of Officers:

1. The Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be elected as follows: the incumbent Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee; this committee shall present a slate of names to which may be added nominations from the floor. Such nominations shall be voted upon during the first session of the annual meeting.

2. The Missions Committee shall recommend a Superintendent of Missions when there is a vacancy; election shall be by majority vote of the Association, and for an indefinite period.

3. The Associational Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood shall select directors for their respective organizations, and recommend these persons to the Nominating Committee to be presented with the other nominees proposed for election.

### SECTION III. Terms of office shall be as follows:

1. All elected officers shall take office at the close of the last session of the annual associational meeting.

2. The duties of the Clerk serving during the current session are not ended, however, until the work of the session is completed and the minutes printed and distributed.

3. The Moderator may serve no more than four years consecutively.

4. All committee members appointed and elected in the annual session shall begin their work at the close of the annual meeting and continue through the next annual session of the Association.

## ARTICLE V—Executive Committee

SECTION I. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers named in Article IV, and one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, with the Moderator as Chairman.

SECTION II. The Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by the Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the Committee.

SECTION III. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

1. To act in behalf of the Association between annual meetings of the Association.
2. To carry out the plans laid at the annual session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the associational work.
3. No obligations to exceed \$500 may be undertaken by the Executive Committee on behalf of the Association, without specific authority from the Association.

#### ARTICLE VI—Missions Committee

**SECTION I.** The Missions Committee shall be composed of a Director and eleven additional members recommended by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association in annual meeting. All mission work sponsored by the Association shall be under the supervision and direction of the Missions Committee.

**SECTION II.** Duties of the Missions Committee:

1. This Committee shall, when a vacancy occurs in the office of Superintendent of Missions, recommend a successor based upon the approved job description, to the annual meeting, or to a special called meeting of the Association.
2. It shall work in cooperation with the Director of Missions of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.
3. It shall supervise the activities of, and work with, the Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association.
4. It shall meet quarterly receiving written monthly reports from the Superintendent of Missions and make suggestions to him concerning the work of the Association.
5. It shall advise any group seeking to organize a mission or church.
6. It shall assist, upon request, churches with particular problems.
7. It shall maintain awareness of the mission needs of the churches in the Association and be ready to recommend ways in which these needs may be met.
8. It shall prepare and present a budget to the annual meeting of the Association.

**SECTION III.** The Missions Committee shall recommend to the Association for approval a job description for the Superintendent of Missions, who will serve as ex officio member of all committees.

#### ARTICLE VII—Steering Committee

**SECTION I.** The Steering Committee shall be composed of the Vice Moderator as chairman, the pastors of the member churches, and two lay members elected by each church and named in the associational letter.

**SECTION II.** The responsibilities of the Steering Committee shall be:

1. To meet quarterly with the Executive Committee to consider the Kingdom work in the Association.
2. To assist in the promotion of the work of the Association in the churches.
3. To assist committee's reports in acquainting the churches with different phases of the work.

#### ARTICLE VIII—Other Committees

**SECTION I.** The following committees shall be composed of three or more members each. They shall be appointed by the Moderator and the Committee on Committees, at the annual associational meeting, to serve in the ensuing year and for the next annual meeting.

**SECTION II.** Duties of these committees shall be:

1. Committee on Committees: To work with the Moderator in the annual session in the appointment of committees.
2. Nominating Committee: to nominate the associational officers and recommend to the Executive Committee replacements for vacancies occurring during the year. Nominees shall first have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.
3. Committee on Reports:
  - a. This committee shall inform our people about the work they have been chosen to represent and lead in promoting it.

b. They shall make brief written reports to the annual associational meeting.

c. This committee consists of a member for each of the following phases of work: Evangelism, Cooperative Program, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

**4. Program Committee:**

a. This committee shall prepare a printed program for the annual associational meeting, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors.

b. This committee shall, in the opening meeting, present the printed program for adoption with necessary adjustments.

**5. Committee on Places and Preachers:**

a. This committee shall recommend the time and place or places for the next annual associational meeting.

b. This committee shall recommend the preachers and alternates for the Associational Sermon and the Missionary Sermon.

**6. Constitutional Amendment Committee:**

a. This committee shall consider and recommend changes in this Constitution which have been referred to them in the regular annual meeting.

b. This committee shall recommend changes in this Constitution that become necessary for clarity and for the proper functioning of the associational work.

**7. Committee on Resolutions:**

a. This committee shall consider and present to the annual association meeting any resolutions referred to them.

b. They shall prepare and present any further resolutions deemed expedient to them.

**8. Youth Committee:**

a. This committee shall work with, in advisory capacity, the youth of the Association.

b. They shall promote programs that are of interest to the youth, such as music festivals, camps, retreats, study courses, fellowships and the like.

**9. Ordination Committee:**

a. When so requested by a member church, they shall examine any candidate for the gospel ministry, in matters of life, doctrine, personal faith, cooperation, and any others relating to the ministerial call.

b. Upon approval, they shall recommend the ordination of this candidate.

**10. Seminary Extension Committee:** they shall promote & direct the Seminary Extension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director & Registrar annually. They shall appoint teacher in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for classes in this program.

## ARTICLE IX—Annual Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be on Thursday and Friday following the first Sunday in August.

## ARTICLE X—Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting on the second day. (this statement be amended to read as follows:)

1. This constitution may be amended in the following manner:

Notification of the proposed amendment shall be made in writing to each Church in the Association not less than thirty days, and not more than sixty days, prior to the annual meeting, such notification coming through the Associational office.

2. A copy of the proposed amendment shall be provided to each messenger present for the first session.

3. A first reading of the proposed amendment must be approved by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the first session of the annual meeting. All changes, if any, to the

proposed amendment shall be presented to the assembly at the first session prior to this first reading vote.

4. A final approval of the amendment shall be by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the second session of the annual meeting.

## ARTICLE XI

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned.

Amended to read as follows:

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned, except where it may be in conflict with this Constitution.

## ARTICLE XII (Added Addition)

Certified copies of this Constitution as amended shall be filed with the office of Superintendent of Missions, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, the Association Historian, and not less than one copy placed in a safety deposit box in a local bank.

# Proceedings

The one hundred sixty-seventh annual French Broad Baptist associational meeting was called to order by Mr. Bruce Phillips, Moderator, on Thursday, August 8 at 7 p.m. at the Paint Gap Baptist Church. Rev. Orlando Hawkins, Pastor of Gabriels Creek Church, gave the invocation. Mrs. Dorothy Roberts, Associational Music Director, led the congregation in singing "Praise Him! Praise Him!", "I Will Sing the Wondrous Story", and "When We All Get to Heaven." Rev. Robert Selman, Pastor of Mt. Pleasant Church, brought the devotions taking his scripture from I Thessalonians 3.

Rev. W. L. Lynch, Program Committee Chairman, was recognized and made a motion the program be adopted as printed with any changes or corrections made as needed. The roll call of churches was made by the clerk, Mrs. Lester Murphey. Rev. E. J. Jenkins, Associational Missionary, recognized the visitors present. Those present were: Rev. and Mrs. Bill Poole, Mr. and Mrs.

Marse Grant, Rev. Tom Greene, Rev. Guy Cain, and Rev. Robert Schreckenburger. New pastors recognized were: Rev. Everett Haney, Chapel Hill; Rev. Dale Butler, Enon; Rev. Troy Martin, Laurel Bend; Rev. Jay Blankenship, Laurel Branch; Rev. Robert Selman, Mt. Pleasant; Rev. J. C. Wilson, Mt. Sheba; Rev. Sherman Tweed, Oak Grove; Rev. Charles Smith (Interim), Piney Mountain; Rev. Charles Rogers, Upper Laurel; and Rev. Sam Austin, Piney Grove. Rev. Jenkins also made the announcement that Rev. Jack Burnette, Pastor of Forks of Ivy, who is in Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem is improving in answer to many prayers.

Rev. Gordon Ball was recognized to present the Nominating Committee Report (No. 1) and the slate of 1975 associational officers. He added one position which was not included in the typed report: Director of Evangelism, Rev. Worth Emory. Mr. Theodore Robinson made the following amendment to the report, "I move we amend the report by substituting the name 'Wade Huey' for 'Perry Willis' as Director of Missions." This motion was seconded by Mrs. Ray Buckner. A vote was taken and the amendment was NOT approved. The original Nomination Committee Report was adopted.

The directions to North Fork Baptist Church were given at this time.

Rev. Richard Price stated there had been no request for new members into the Association (No. 2).

Rev. Ralph Hogan gave the Constitution Amendment Report. A discussion followed. Rev. Joe Godwin made the suggestion that the amendments be voted on during both sessions. The vote was unanimous to adopt the amendments. A second vote will be taken tomorrow.

The announcement was made that any church wishing to host the association next year should contact Rev. H. L. Wilson.

Mr. Joe Keller gave the Cooperative Program Report (No. 3). Rev. Tom Greene gave a response to the report. Cooperative Program Receipts for the first two quarters were distributed. Rev. Greene asked that any corrections be made immediately to the Business Office of the Baptist State Convention. He urged all churches to increase their Cooperative Program giving by 15% due to inflation. The report was adopted.

A hymn "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" was sung by the congregation as an offering of \$70.46 was taken for the associational treasury.

The moderator announced there were 110 messengers, 19 alternates, and 38 visitors registered for the night session making a total of 167.

The Baptist Homes for the Aging Report (No. 4) was adopted. Rev. Bob Poole gave a response to the report. He gave some information on the site of the new Homes for the Aging in Asheville and extended an invitation to all churches to visit the site.

Mrs. Locke Robinson gave a report on the Woman's Missionary Union (No. 5). She reported a total offering of \$14,152.82 for the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, a total of \$5,327.07 for the Annie Armstrong Offering, and \$1,000 sent to the Charles Buckner family. The report was adopted.

Mr. Walter Harrell gave the Annuity Report (No. 6). Rev. Guy Cain gave a witty response to the report. He urged the churches to place their pastors under the Annuity Program. The report was adopted.

The Evangelism Committee Report (No. 7) was given by Rev. Worth Emory and was adopted.

Mr. Marse Grant spoke at this time regarding Baptist Periodicals since he would be unable to attend the Friday session.

The Forks of Ivy Church choir, under the direction of Mrs. Charles McFarland, sang two beautiful hymns, "I'll Fly Away" and "Heaven Came Down" for the special music.

Rev. H. L. Wilson, Pastor of Little Creek Church, brought the missionary sermon using as his text Acts 1:8. His theme was "Are You Witnessing for Jesus?"

Mr. Jimmy Buckner gave a word of testimony. Rev. M. H. Kendall gave the benediction, and the session was adjourned.

#### FRIDAY, AUGUST 9, 1974

The French Broad Association was again called into session on Friday, August 9 at 9:30 at the North Fork Baptist Church. Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the congregation in singing "Trust and Obey." Rev. Sherman Tweed, Pastor of Oak Grove Church, brought the devotions taking his scriptural text from Psalm 23.

The Baptist Hospital Report (No. 8) was adopted, and Rev. Calvin Knight gave a response to the report. He reported that he had talked with Rev. Jack Burnette, Pastor of Forks of Ivy Church, the night before in Baptist Hospital. Rev. Burnette was improving and was expected to be home shortly. He told of the latest piece of equipment installed at the hospital—the EMI scanner.

Rev. Jenkins recognized the visitors at this time by asking them to stand. Rev. Ralph Hogan, Chairman of the Constitution Amendment Committee (No. 9) brought the amendments before the association again for a vote. The vote that the amendments be adopted carried.

Rev. Sue Fitzgerald gave the Christian Education Report (No. 10). She stated that someone at the last associational meeting had asked what kind of Christian activities were carried on at Mars Hill College. She gave statistics on the Christian Student Movement, revival teams, work at the correction center and VA hospital, and told of the use of a chapel on campus. Rev. Robert Melvin from Mars Hill College, Mr. J. Roy Robinson from Gardner-Webb College, and Rev. Alex Booth from Fruitland gave responses to the report. The report was adopted.

The Baptist Periodicals Report (No. 11) was adopted.

Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the congregation in singing "I Am Thine, O Lord" at which time an offering of \$60 was taken for associational work.

The Baptist Children's Home Report (No. 12) was adopted. Mr. Hugh Starnes gave a response to the report, thanking people of the French Broad Association for their support.

The State, Home, and Foreign Missions Report (No. 13) was adopted, and Rev. Robert Schrenkenburg gave a response to the report. He told how men from the French Broad Association had come to Idaho at two different times to build churches in which the people there could worship. The last church was built for people who were worshipping in a Casino in Jack Pot, Nevada—the only place available for worship.

Mrs. Janie Franklin gave the Civic Righteousness Report (No. 14), and it was adopted. Mrs. George McGill gave a response to the report. She emphasized the Safety Sabbath Weekend, August 23-25, and asked that everyone observe this weekend by burning their headlights while driving.

Mr. Wade Huey gave the Missions Committee Report and the Associational Budget (No. 15) for the coming year, stating that the two major increases in the budget were in travel and office expenses. The report was adopted.

Mr. Vance Edwards gave the Treasurer's Report and World Mission Conference Finance Report (No. 16), stating that as of July 1, 1974 the Association had a balance of \$555.06. The report was adopted.

Miss Sadie Wallin moved that the Stewardship Report (No. 17) be adopted. This was seconded and the report was adopted.

Rev. E. J. Jenkins made a motion the Superintendent of Missions Report (No. 18) be adopted with the correction of some typing errors. This was seconded and the report was adopted.

Mrs. Charlie Clayton made a motion the Committee on Committees Report (No. 20) be adopted. It was seconded and adopted.

Mr. Bruce Phillips then gave the Executive Committee Report (No. 19), especially expressing appreciation to Rev. Lester Murphey and Miss Marie Willis for their efforts in helping to defeat liquor-by-the-drink in Madison County.

The North Fork Church choir, led by Jimmy Buckner, sang two beautiful hymns "Grace for Every Need" and "Rock of Ages Keep My Soul" for the special music. They requested prayer since all choir members were not present due to the death of a faithful church member—Al Buckner.

The associational sermon was delivered by Rev. Stanley Peek, Pastor of Paint Gap Church. His scripture came from I Corinthians 2:1-5, and his theme was "Give Your All."

Rev. Frank Plemmons, Pastor of North Fork, expressed appreciation for the attendance.

Rev. Calvin Knight gave the blessing. The North Fork Church treated everyone to a delicious meal.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

Rev. Stanley Peek, Vice-Moderator, presided during the afternoon session. He thanked the people of North Fork for a delightful meal.

Rev. Frank Plemmons, Pastor of North Fork Church, gave the devotions taking his scripture from Psalm 23. His theme was "The Lord Is Our Shepherd."

The clerk gave the Digest of Church Letters (No. 21), and this was adopted with the understanding that additions would be made if any other church letters came in.

Dr. Evelyn Underwood made a motion the Historian's Report (No. 22) be adopted. This was seconded and adopted.

The American Bible Society Report (No. 23) was adopted.

The Sunday School Report (No. 24) was adopted. Mr. Bert Potter gave a response to this report. He stressed the new "Reach Out" Program which has as a goal to have 5,000,000 people in Sunday School on November 17—500,000 of these in North Carolina.

Mr. Walter Harrell gave the Church Training Report (No. 25), and it was adopted.

The Brotherhood Report (No. 26) was adopted, and Mr. Ed Bullock gave a response to it. He emphasized that every church can have Royal Ambassadors and a Brotherhood if there is only one person interested.

The Vacation Bible School Report (No. 27) was adopted. The Music Report (No. 28) was adopted, and Mrs. Roberts made the announcement that the Fifth Sunday Hymn Sing in September would be held at Piney Mountain.

Rev. Jenkins made the announcement that there is a portable library available in the Association which contains literature for all age groups. It can be kept at any church for three to six months free of charge.

From A Casino to A Church (No. 29) and World Mission Conference (No. 30) reports were adopted.

A request was made by Rev. Jenkins that the Associational Office be moved to the vicinity of the Marshall By Pass. This move would take place by November 1. Discussion followed. Rev. Richard Price made a motion Rev. Jenkins be allowed to make this move. The motion was seconded and the vote carried.

Rev. Lester Murphey thanked the people of Madison County for their support in the liquor-by-the-drink defeat. He also called attention to the financial report of the Christian Action League in the Book of Reports.

A suggestion was made that money be taken to buy flowers for a memorial in remembrance of Al Buckner, a faithful member of North Fork Church, who passed away on August 8. An offering of \$23.31 was taken.

Rev. Joseph Godwin made the suggestion that there was a need for a parliamentarian for the Association. A motion was made that this be tabled and turned over to the Constitution Amendment Committee for an amendment next year. This was seconded and the vote carried.

The Steering Committee Report (No. 31) was adopted; and Rev. Peek, Chairman of the Committee, stressed sending representatives from each church to the Steering Committee Meetings.

The Seminary Extension Report (No. 32) was adopted. Rev. Godwin expressed his appreciation for working with the people of the host church—North Fork in Seminary Extension. The least he had enrolled in four different sessions was 39.

The Ordination Report (No. 33) was adopted.

The Committee on Reports (No. 34) was adopted.

Mr. Harvey Franklin gave the Places and Preachers Report (No. 35). ## BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

As a Baptist, one of the many vital ministries that you support is your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging. For over 23 years you have served hundreds of older people by giving to the Special Offering on the third Sunday of February; and through the Cooperative Program. Each year has shown an increase in these two sources of income, and the amount is expected to exceed \$350,000 during 1974.

Our five Homes are located in Albemarle, Hamilton, Yanceyville, and Winston-Salem. Resthaven, Hayes Home, and the Nursing Care Unit are all located in Winston-Salem. In these homes, four out of every five residents depend upon our gifts.

Of great significance during the past year, is the decision to establish a sixth home in Western North Carolina. This home would be located in Asheville on the beautiful twenty-one acre Pearson Estate. After approval by the General Board, and the Baptist State Convention, a major State-Wide fund-raising project will be launched to raise the necessary money to build this home.

With the addition of this sixth Home for the Aging, with the spiraling cost of living, and the great and ever-increasing needs of older people, it is most urgent that our Baptist people be more generous than ever before in support for the Homes through the third Sunday of February Offering, the Cooperative Program, and a special gift for the Western North Carolina Home.

## EVANGELISM REPORT

The continuing response of youth and adults to Lay Evangelism Schools has been significant. In the past thirty months 11,032 youth and adults have shared in this lay witness training from 855 churches and 44 associations. Also 107 pastors from nine other associations have participated in Pastor's Retreats dealing with Lay Evangelism.

"SHARING HIS LOVE AND SPIRIT" was the theme of the 28th Statewide Evangelism Conference at Greensboro. Over 2,400 pastors and lay persons heard excellent speakers emphasize various phases of evangelism.

God is greatly blessing the evangelistic ministry of our three summer youth evangelism teams. Youth Ministries Week was held at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly during June for about 700 youth and adults with the emphasis on evangelism, vocational guidance and recreation.

About 15,000 youth, pastors, and adult leaders are expected to attend the 4th Statewide Youth Evangelism Night at Greensboro Coliseum on August 16. Christian youth continue to share a strong witness for Jesus Christ across our State.

Let us rejoice in the leadership of the Holy Spirit in wonderful revival meetings, city-wide crusades, and evangelism clinics during the past year.

The 29th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, during February, 1975.

Although we have not participated in evangelism a great deal in the past, we hope to do more in the future.

Remember to pray daily for the work of evangelism in all the churches of our Association, state, nation, and world.

## BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Our Baptist Hospital is constantly making additions and changes in order to provide the best medical care possible. The equipment is the most up-to-date in this area. The newest addition being an EMI-Scanner which is expected to be in use before the end of this year. This piece of equipment will make it possible to detect brain tumors, blood clots, and strokes more accurately and more quickly.

The Department of Pastoral Care is conducting retreats, seminars, and workshops to aid in the Hospital's ministry to the emotional and spiritual needs of our people. It has also opened its first satellite center in Fayetteville, which offers counseling and training to people in that area. Our gifts through the Cooperative Program help to support these important ministries.

The trustees of Baptist Hospital decided in 1971 to phase out the school of nursing—the last class graduated in May of this year.

Thousands of patients receive medical care in our Baptist Hospital each year. Many of the patients need financial aid to pay for this care. Our Mother's Day gifts are used solely for the purpose of paying the costs of care which cannot be met in some other way. A special committee of five Baptists from the Winston-Salem area assists personnel from the hospital Business Office and the Department of Denominational Relations in administering these funds. For each dollar contributed to the Mother's Day Offering, the Hospital is able to provide ten dollars worth of free care for some needy patient.

The 1973 Mother's Day Offerings amounted to \$375,000. As of June, our 1974 Mother's Day gifts are running ahead of the same time last year. Give generously through the Cooperative Program and the Mother's Day Offering so that our Baptist Hospital can continue to grow and to minister with skill and understanding.

## CONSTITUTION AMENDMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

The Constitution Amendment Committee has tried to study the Constitution throughout the year and at a final meeting on July 9 finalize the following amendments to the Constitution to be presented at the Annual Meeting on August 8 & 9, 1974. The Committee recommends that the Amendments be approved and become a part of the Constitution as recorded in the 1973 Minutes.

Article X. This constitution may be amended in the following manner:

1. Notification of the proposed amendment shall be made in writing to each church in the Association not less than thirty days, and not more than sixty days, prior to the annual meeting, such notification coming through the Associational Office.
2. A copy of the proposed amendment shall be provided to each messenger present for the first session.
3. A first reading of the proposed amendment must be approved by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the first session of the annual meeting. All changes, if any, to the proposed amendment shall be presented to the assembly at the first session prior to this first reading vote.
4. The final approval of the amendment shall be by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the second session of the annual meeting.

Article XI. The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned, except where it may be in conflict with this Constitution.

Article XII. Certified copies of this Constitution as amended shall be filed with the office of Superintendent of Missions, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, the Association Historian, and not less than one copy placed in a safety deposit box in a local bank.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

Usually the Christian Education Report deals with our Baptist Colleges and their relation to the local church. This leaves out one important part of Christian Education, our seminaries. Southern Baptists have six seminaries located in various parts of our convention. Our oldest seminary, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary is located in Louisville, Kentucky. Since its founding in 1845 it has graduated 11,814 students.

Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, our largest seminary in enrollment was founded in 1907 and is located in Fort Worth, Texas. This year it has had its all time high in enrollment—2,622.

The third seminary to be founded by Southern Baptists is New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. Out of the 861 enrolled this year 102 are Home and Foreign Mission volunteers.

Our seminary on the west coast is Golden Gate Theological Seminary located in Mill Valley, California. The youngest seminary, Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, located in Kansas City, Missouri, was founded in 1958. This year it has had a record enrollment of 558.

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is the closest one to us and is the only one located in a small town, Wake Forest, North Carolina. Dr. Olin Binkley has just completed his important ministry as President of the school. Dr. Randall Lolley was elected to succeed him.

Southern and Southeastern Seminaries are our closest seminaries and have contributed to the spiritual growth of ministers and churches throughout our state. Each year Mars Hill College sends many students to these two seminaries. In fact, only five schools send more students to these two seminaries than Mars Hill College.

One other aspect of our seminary work which I have not mentioned is seminary extension. Through classes right here in French Broad Association our seminaries have come right home to us. We have a direct part in helping our seminaries through the Cooperative Program. Our seminaries contribute to us not just through ministers who study on one of the six campuses but directly as we study in seminary extension classes. We are grateful for the work of our seminaries.

Also, the following information was not available at the time the Book of Reports was printed so it was given at the associational meeting as an addition to the Christian Education Report:

Last year someone asked about the spiritual life at Mars Hill. I thought of no better way to answer this than to ask the president of the Christian Student Movement, Jim Blanton, about religious activities. I waited until after school was out so it could be the facts and figures from this year. The College recognizes that Bible is essential in the maturing Christian and requires that all students take a four-hour course as well as to give evidence of understanding the Bible. A course cannot do it all. It takes teachers interested in students, students interested in their own growth, students interested in each other and students who want to reach out beyond themselves. At the beginning of school, the Christian Student Movement asked students to sign an interest card. Nearly one-third of the student body showed an interest in Christian ministries. The preschool retreat, last year involving approximately 300 students, is the first opportunity to help students see how they can get involved in religious activities as well as see opportunities for spiritual growth.

Each Thursday night during the school year, students gather for prayer and meditation in "Sing and Share" time. These average anywhere from 150 to 250 students. Students also see the need for small group activities and are involved in share groups, Bible study and action groups with no more than 6 to 12 students meeting in dorms, at the church or in other places.

Not all of the student's spiritual life is "taking in" but much is "giving out" as they share their faith in many ways. Each weekend students go to the Juvenile Evaluation Center, Western North Carolina Sanatorium, and Veteran's Hospital to lead chapel services and room to room visitation. Thirty weekend revivals were held last year involving about 150 students.

During January last year, 30 students worked under the Home Mission Board at mission sites in Phoenix, Arizona and Baltimore, Maryland. Involved in various internships were 18 other students serving in churches near by and as far away as Winter Park, Florida.

Students like to express their faith through music, and they had the opportunity in the Christian Student Movement Choir. Composed of 70 members they sang in churches in Western North Carolina, went on tour with the musical, "Joy," and presented a special Easter program at Mars Hill. There is one Folk-team called "Dayspring" which has sung and witnessed in quite a few churches in our area.

Students have used vacation time as a time to share their faith. Spring break found 38 students working in five Baptist centers under the Home Mission Board. During the summer, students have been serving as youth workers in churches. Four students are working with the Home Mission Board this summer.

One thing I have failed to mention that cannot be counted in numbers or as a special meeting time but has really been an important part of the life of the campus—the chapel. Although strategically located in the mainstream of student traffic (below the cafeteria), the chapel is an atmosphere of quietness conducive to quiet meditation. It is open 24-hours every day with two regularly scheduled devotional periods each morning—7:30 and 8:30. Jim Blanton said, "The heavy use our chapel is receiving is one manifestation of the religious character of the students here." I would invite you to go by the chapel and visit and stay to pray.

In the last issue of the college paper, THE HILLTOP, the staff requested seniors to submit a brief thought about Mars Hill. Joey Hinson, a football player, said, "The greatest thing that happened to me while I was at Mars Hill College was in February, 1972, when I accepted Jesus Christ as my personal Saviour. Jesus Christ is the central figure in my life now and always will be. . . I love the people at Mars Hill College and the people make Mars Hill what it is. It is time for me to leave

Mars Hill and to go out into the world to serve Jesus Christ and to become what He would have me to be."

Religious activities do not reach all students just as our churches do not reach all people around us who need us, but I thank God for people and events on the campus that reach out to persons like Joey, helping them find new life in Christ.

## BAPTIST PERIODICALS REPORT

The Apostle Paul learned early in his ministry that organizing a church and constructing an edifice was just a beginning. If a church was to survive, the members had to engage in the learning of God's laws in order to attain the Christian maturity and the unity of fellowship which would sustain them against the evils of the day. Paul was constant in his communication with the churches. This constituted the teaching program for the Christians in these early churches. We can feel the fervor of his soul as he wrote to the young Christians: "I tell you, then: do not let anyone fool you with false arguments, no matter how good they seem to be. See to it, then, that no one makes a captive of you with the worthless deceit of human wisdom, which comes from the teachings handed down by men, and not from Christ. And so we shall all come together to that oneness in our faith and in our knowledge of the Son of God; we shall become mature men reaching to the very height of Christ's full stature. So stand ready: have truth for a belt tight around your waist."

The present day church and church members are surrounded by the forces of evil and false doctrines to even a greater degree than in the times of Paul. Paul has shown us how a church can survive through a strong Bible-centered teaching program.

Let me entreat all church members of the French Broad Baptist Association to support the teaching agencies in your church. All Southern Baptist Literature is based on the Bible. Regular study of the Bible with the help of our Southern Baptist Literature will bring Christian maturity and a unity of fellowship to our churches which will guarantee their survival.

This past year our county and state experienced this unity of fellowship as the churches worked to defeat the liquor-by-the-drink referendum. The BIBLICAL RECORDER was the organizing and motivating agent in this defeat of the wet forces. Every church in our county should subscribe to the BIBLICAL RECORDER in order to be informed on matters relating to the Baptist work in the State of North Carolina.

Let me encourage each church in the French Broad Baptist Association to take a critical look at their teaching program, and to utilize Southern Baptist periodicals wherever feasible to strengthen their church work.

## STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

“But when He saw the multitudes, He was moved with compassion on them, because they fainted, and were scattered abroad, as sheep having no shepherd. Then saith He unto His disciples, The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few; Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth labourers into His harvest.” Matt. 9:36-38

With words like these, Jesus taught his followers to care and to share. Southern Baptists prove that they care by sharing Christ with the world through the ministry of the Cooperative Program. It is a way of Southern Baptist churches cooperating by putting their money together to support those who share a Christian witness beyond their own local community. Baptist colleges, hospitals, children's homes, and retirement centers are a part of the Cooperative Program. Beyond our state, we share our Christian witness through several agencies and boards. Two of the largest are the Home Mission Board which sends out missionaries in the United States, and the Foreign Mission Board which sends out missionaries to other countries.

For achieving the mission of the church, the local church is the focal point. Where Jesus Christ is present as Lord in the life and work of His people, they are involved in living fellowship with Him and with each other to do His work in the world. The Holy Spirit takes the work of Christ and relates it to his people and his people to the work of their Lord. This spiritual dynamic leads a church to minister, to witness, and to apply the gospel as she gives herself in missions in her local community. The capacity and need of the local church for fellowship with like-minded churches give rise to the association of churches. Through the association a correlation of missions in a larger area is possible.

The State Convention provides a larger means for the work of missions. It is vitally related to both churches and associations because of missions being the informing life force of all three.

The Home Mission Board is an Agency of the Southern Baptist Convention. Its objective is to support the Convention in its task of bringing men to God through Jesus Christ by developing and promoting, in cooperating with churches, associations, and state conventions, a single uniform Southern Baptist missions program for the United States and assigned territories. In seeking to realize this objective, the Board has emphasized three broad areas of service: (1) evangelism, (2) establishing new churches, and (3) ministries to persons with special needs.

As 1974 began, Southern Baptists were represented overseas by 2,538 missionaries assigned to serve in 77 countries and territories. The Foreign Mission Board's programs of work around the world are described in functional terms as evangelism and church development, schools and student work, publication work, hospitals and medical care, and benevolent ministries.

## CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS REPORT

Praise God for the liquor-by-the-drink defeat. Many outstanding Christian men and women worked hard and are to be commended for their leading roles but to all that had a part, a prayer, a vote, to God be the Glory for the stand you took.

There is another deep and despairing problem we must face, DRUG ABUSE. This problem gets close to us because it's such a threat to our young people. The National Clearinghouse for Drug Abuse Information gives five considerations that could make an impact on our drug problem: 1. A double standard produces a credibility gap. Adults who misuse liquor, tobacco, or other drugs should be judged by the same standards as young people. 2. Children should not be continually exposed to the idea that the stresses of daily life require chemical relief. Respect for all chemicals, especially mind-altering chemicals, should be instilled in people at an early age. 3. Factual information about drugs should be stressed, rather than attempts to frighten people. 4. Efforts to detect and apprehend all illegal manufacturers and large-scale traffickers of illicit drugs should increase. 5. Further research in prevention, education, and treatment techniques should be carried out.

This problem seems hard to cope with but we can keep this thought in mind as we work. We can do together what we cannot do alone! Then too, I believe we must ask God for a greater understanding and for guidance to bring new light to this problem.

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The first meeting of the Executive Committee of the French Broad Baptist Association convened Tuesday, October 16, 1973, 7:30 P.M. in the Association Office. The Moderator brought to the attention of the Committee his concern about the coming November referendum on the issue of liquor-by-the-drink. The Committee then gave attention to several steps to be taken by this Executive Committee in an effort to defeat liquor-by-the-drink. It was suggested that Rev. Wesley Sprinkle be invited to speak to the Association Steering Committee on the issue of liquor-by-the-drink at Trinity Church, October 28, 1973 at 2:30 P.M. Discussion was held pertaining to salary supplement from the State Board for our Associational Missionary work. The State Board supplemented our Association Budget last year in the sum of \$1,728.00. Motion was made by Rev. Stanley Peek and seconded by Mr. Walter Harrell that we request \$2,275.00 for the coming year. Motion carried. The Moderator expressed the hope that in the very near future our Association would be entirely self-supporting. If our convictions are as strong as our name "missionary" implies, then with our large number of churches, and their memberships of strong, solid missionary-minded Christians, it is time we stood on our own feet, not having to depend on state financial help. The Committee elected Mr. Walter Harrell as Director of Church Training.

The Executive and Missions Committees met on Thursday, Dec. 13, following the Associational Christmas Party at Mars Hill Church. A motion was made by Mr. Wade Huey that the \$2,100.00 requested supplement for Belva Baptist Church be approved. The motion passed. A resolution of appreciation was passed, recognizing Rev. M. H. Kendall for his 20 years of service to the Piney Mountain Church. The Moderator, Mr. Phillips, expressed appreciation for a job very well done to Rev. Lester Murphey of the Christian Action League and Miss Marie Willis, along with countless others who gave their time and money in the successful fight against liquor-by-the-drink, an issue which was predicted to be very close, but which, due to dedicated untiring effort, went down in crushing defeat.

The Missions Committee decided not to have a Mission Work in Spillcorn this summer unless it is with the Community Church. Also the Missions Committee supports the endeavor to help build the Baptist Church in Jack Pot, Nevada. They planned to assist with construction of the Belva Church upon their return from Nevada.

The last meeting of the Executive Committee prior to the Annual Meeting was held Sunday, July 7, 1974 at 2:30 in the Association Office. A motion was made by Mr. Walter Harrell that the Executive Committee recommend to the Annual Meeting that annual church letters be deleted from the minutes if they are not in the hands of the Association Clerk by fifteen days after the Annual Association Meeting. A discussion followed concerning apparent unfinished business with regard to our Constitution. Rev. Don Gasperson stated that he was sure the Constitution Committee would report to the Annual Meeting proposed changes which would clarify amendments ten and eleven of our Constitution.

I would like to express my appreciation to the members of the Executive Committee for their splendid work and cooperation; and to the French Broad Association for this opportunity to serve. I pledge my continuing support to united Baptist effort and to the officers for the coming year.

## HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The year, 1973-74, was a good year for the French Broad Baptist Association. Through continued efforts the Association cooperated with all the programs sponsored by the State and Southern Baptist Conventions, and added to these some special projects of its own. Offerings for State, Foreign, and Home Missions were unusually good (see financial report). Gifts through the Cooperative Program were increased also. According to the report in April (the final report was not available at the time this was written) four more churches than last year gave through the Program—35 as compared to 31 in 1972-73, and the total contributions exceeded those of 1972-73 by \$2,234.86. The final report may well exceed that amount.

Throughout the year a major emphasis was placed on study and training in church leadership. Seminary Extension classes were held in September and in March. Association officers attended state training sessions at Ridgecrest, Camp Caraway, and Camp Mundo Vista, and local clinics and conferences were held for leaders in the Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, Brotherhood, and the several mission organizations. In January the Associational leadership encouraged all churches to provide a week of Bible study, using the book of Colossians as the text. Groups of young people and adults participated in retreats where study and fellowship encouraged the spiritual growth of members and officers, of the several church organizations. A number of churches had revivals during the year and new converts were added, while many members were strengthened in their commitment to the Lord.

Efforts to expand and improve church ministries were made throughout the Association. A number of churches, including Little Ivy, Belva, Forks of Ivy, California Creek, Paint Gap, and Bethel secured buses and are now providing transportation to those who need it. Other churches have been providing this service for some time.

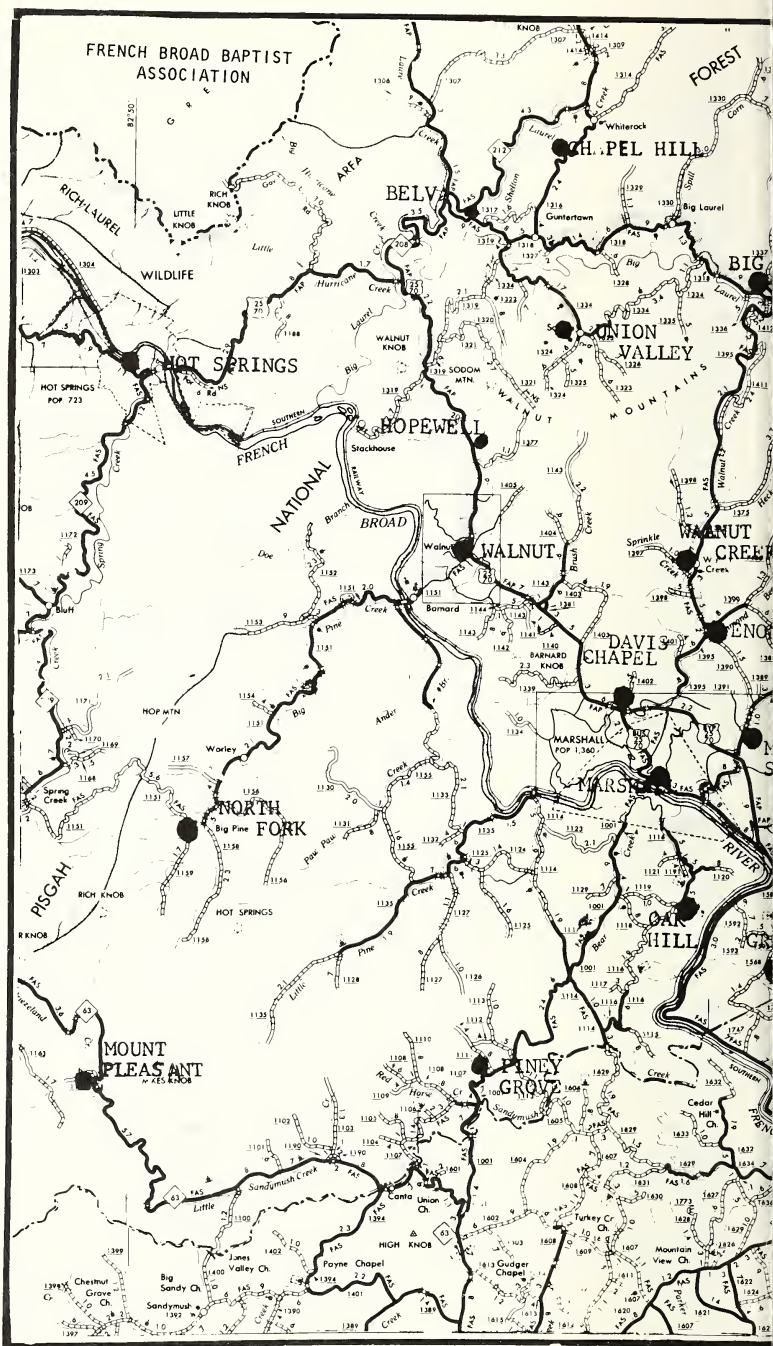
A number of churches improved their facilities, which in turn can provide more effective teaching and training ministries for their people. Belva, one of the Association's newest churches, is at present constructing an adequate building for its congregation. Hard physical labor on the part of the pastor and members, as well as the spiritual dedication of all, is making this task possible. Calvary completed it's new building this year and are now enjoying the expanded services the new structure can accommodate. Other churches, including Long Branch, Grandview, Union Valley, Little Creek, Arrington Branch, Mt. Sheba, Chapel Hill, Alexander, and Forks of Ivy made improvements on their buildings and grounds. Each year we rejoice in the number of congregations that make great efforts to improve their church buildings. Concern for the Lord's House indicates a concern for His work and all these congregations are to be commended for their good work.

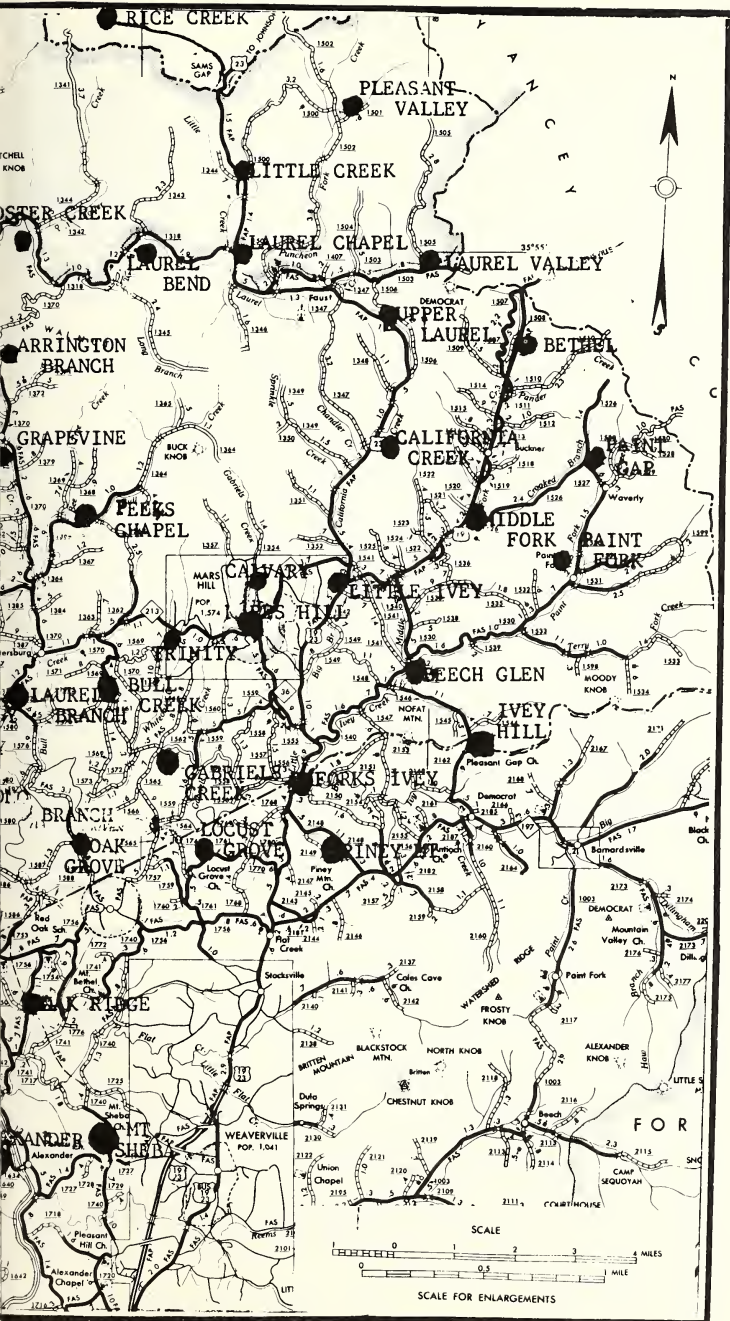
In addition to their regular programs of work, churches in the Association undertook three special projects this past year. During November, 1973, twenty-nine churches participated in a World Missions Conference, and all who shared in these meetings were blessed. In May, 1974, a group from the Association "went West" and built a church in that town. In July, 1974, the Association Camp for young and old was held at Ivy Hill Church. Reports from those who attended indicate that the good work done in that camp will be felt throughout the Association for a long time.

Six Churches have called new pastors during the past year: Enon, California Creek, Laurel Bend, Oak Grove, Mt. Sheba, Chapel Hill, and Laurel Branch. Two Pastors retired during the year: Rev. Roy Keller and Rev. Jesse Slagle. The Association will miss those men, and we pray the blessings of God may follow them as they live and serve even in their retirement. One young man, Gary Shook, was licensed to preach by the Upper Laurel Church.

As 1976 approaches, the nation is preparing to celebrate it's 200th Anniversary. Communities across the land are already working on renewal projects and are laying plans for great celebrations recalling and honoring our national heritage. Surely a spiritual renewal should be a big part of these plans. Religion played an important role in the founding of the new nation and left a significant impact on its heritage. Few would deny that there is real need for spiritual renewal today. I would encourage churches to plan for a Bicentennial Renewal. Write your histories and recognize the "faith of the fathers" who organized and set up the churches on this "frontier." Plan to make your churches and your communities better places in which to live and to worship during the next two hundred years.

The world's best-selling paperback book, GOOD NEWS FOR MODERN MAN, reached a total circulation of more than 43 million copies by the end of 1973.

The American Bible Society is most grateful for its close and continuing relationship with the Southern Baptist Convention in the common purpose of Scripture distribution, and the Society asks Southern Baptist Churches to continue their active support and to make special efforts to support the GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS program.

We know we have the urgent responsibility and glorious challenge of making God's Word available to all who need and want it. It is a responsibility which all Christians must recognize and to which all must respond generously.

## FROM A CASINO TO A CHURCH

The building erected was 36' x 70'. There is a chapel, fellowship room for a day care center, five classrooms, two rest rooms, framed with aluminum on the outside, sheetrocked on the inside with a 23 foot spiral and cross on top. The Jack Pot Community was very gracious and gave every consideration possible, especially Mr. Hubbard, Controller and President of the Horseshoe and Cactus Pete Casinos. He gave \$1,100.00 plus two motel rooms each night for the purpose of taking showers and meals for three days. Others gave in many different ways. The church at Eastside, Twin Falls, Rev. Schreckenber, the Pastor of the mother church and of the mission, gave immeasurably. The Businesses of Twin Falls contributed a great deal. 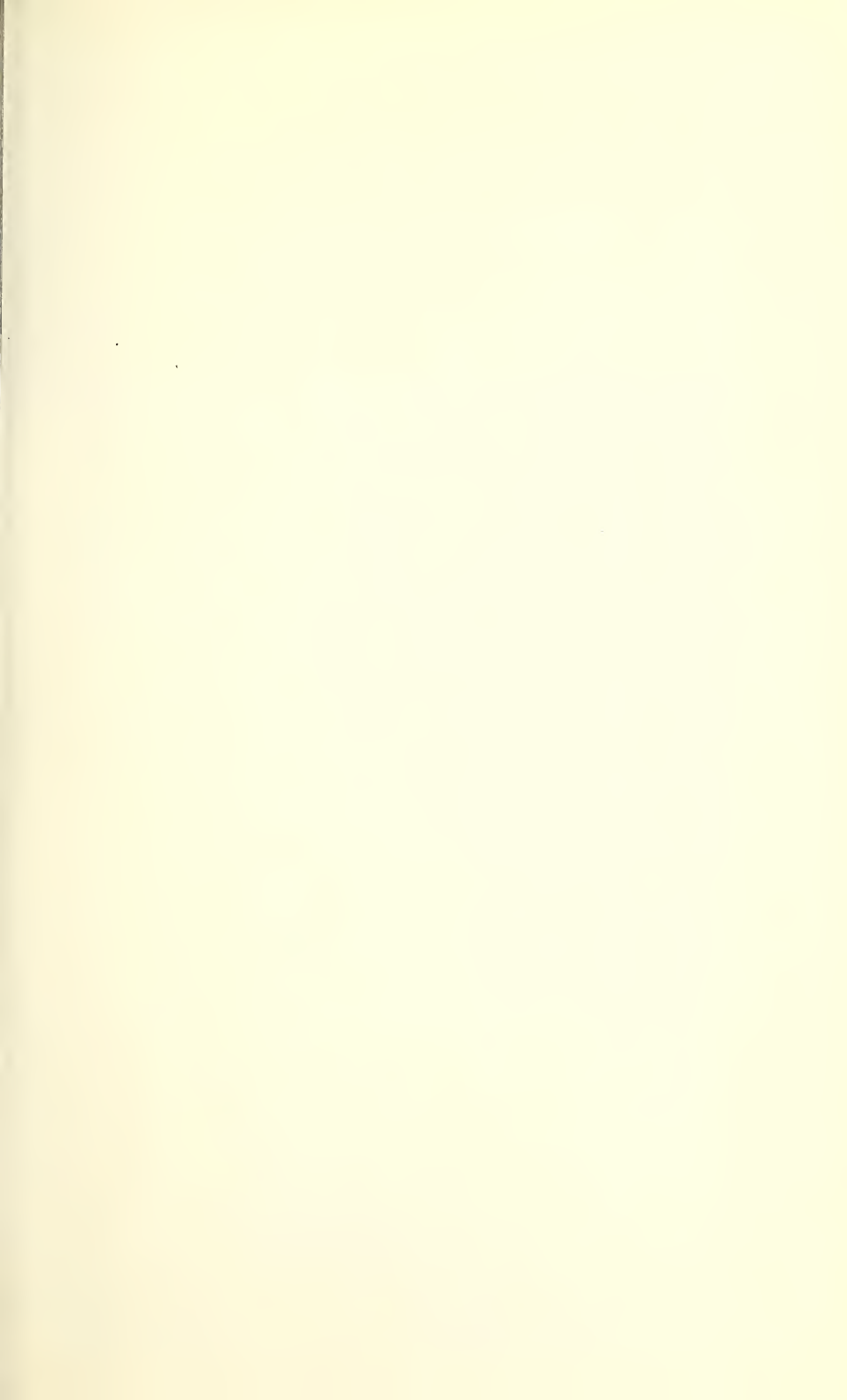

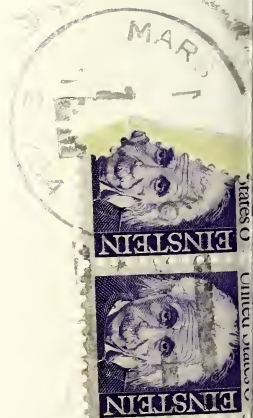

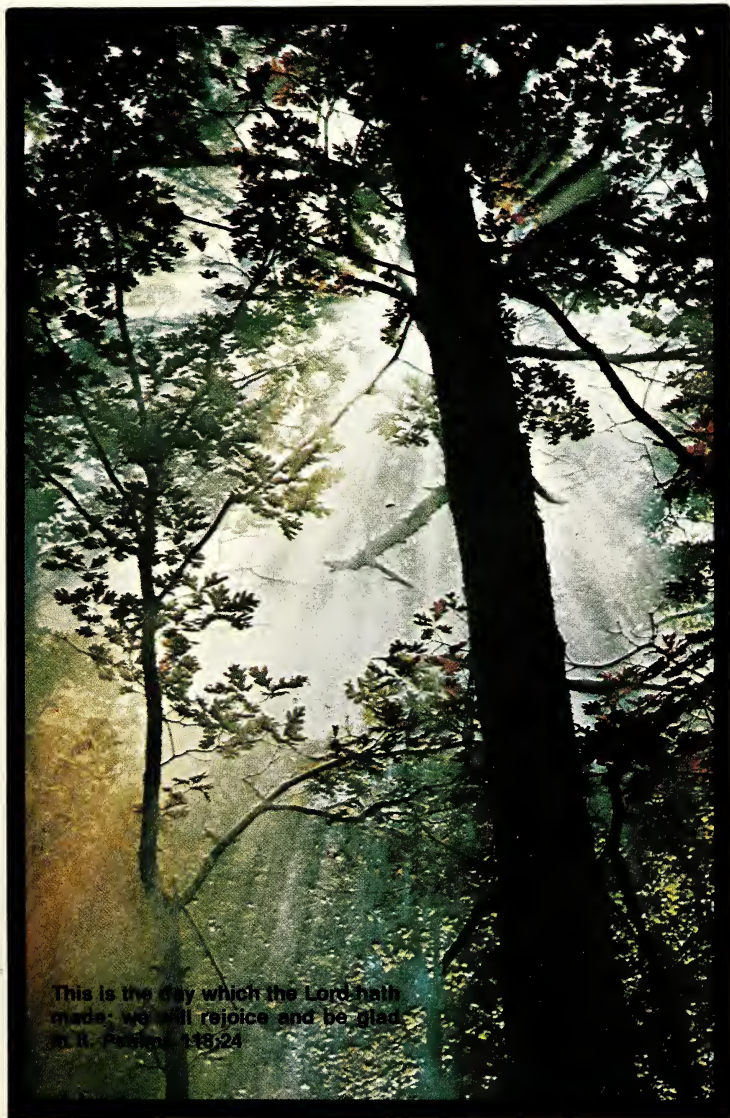

# Constitution

1974

## ARTICLE I—Name

The name of this body shall be the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association.

## ARTICLE II—Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be:

1. To coordinate and promote fellowship and growth, missions, Christian education, and involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors.
2. To cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in Kingdom advancement.
3. The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association.

## ARTICLE III—Membership

### SECTION I. Member Churches

1. This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches in this general area that have been formally accepted as members and who continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association; by naming messengers to the annual meetings; and by reporting to such annual meetings on forms provided by the Association.
2. A church seeking admission to membership in the Association may make application in the following manner:
  - a. Decision to seek such admission shall have been determined by vote of the church in formal business session.
  - b. Copies of the Confession of Faith and the Covenant adopted by the church shall accompany the application.
  - c. Completed application shall be submitted to the Committee on Reception of New Members previous to the opening of an annual meeting of the Association.
3. The Committee on Reception of New Members shall report its findings to the Association on the first day of the annual session following its examination of any application. Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day, each church thus accepted will be enrolled as a member of the Association, and the moderator will extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers present.
4. Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another associ-

ation or to remain unattached, it should proceed in the following manner:

a. Decision to withdraw shall have been determined in formal business session.

b. A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session should be submitted to the Moderator of the Association.

c. The Moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has towards the Association.

d. The committee shall report its findings to the Association in annual session and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. The Association in annual session by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or when the church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association.

## SECTION II. Membership of the Annual Meetings of the Association

1. The elected officers of the Association, all pastors of member churches, and provided they are members of member churches, all persons reporting on any phase of the work of the Association, shall be EX OFFICIO members of the annual meetings.

2. Each member church is entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members above fifty, except that no church shall have more than ten messengers exclusive of the EX OFFICIO members designated above.

3. The EX OFFICIO members in attendance and the elected messengers presenting certification of their election by their churches shall constitute the official voting enrollment in any annual session.

## ARTICLE IV—Officers

### SECTION I. The Officers of the Association shall be:

1. Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of Missions (ex officio), Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, Director of Missions, and Director of Evangelism.

### SECTION II. Election of Officers:

1. The Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be elected as follows: the incumbent Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee; this committee shall present a slate of names to which may be added nominations from the floor. Such nominations shall be voted upon during the first session of the annual meeting.

2. The Missions Committee shall recommend a Superintendent of Missions when there is a vacancy; election shall be by majority vote of the Association, and for an indefinite period.

3. The Associational Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood shall select directors for their respective organizations, and recommend these persons to the Nominating Committee to be presented with the other nominees proposed for election.

### SECTION III. Terms of office shall be as follows:

1. All elected officers shall take office at the close of the last session of the annual associational meeting.

2. The duties of the Clerk serving during the current session are not ended, however, until the work of the session is completed and the minutes printed and distributed.

3. The Moderator may serve no more than four years consecutively.

4. All committee members appointed and elected in the annual session shall begin their work at the close of the annual meeting and continue through the next annual session of the Association.

## ARTICLE V—Executive Committee

SECTION I. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers named in Article IV, and one

pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, with the Moderator as Chairman.  
SECTION II. The Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by the Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the Committee.

SECTION III. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

1. To act in behalf of the Association between annual meetings of the Association.
2. To carry out the plans laid at the annual session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the associational work.
3. No obligations to exceed \$500 may be undertaken by the Executive Committee on behalf of the Association, without specific authority from the Association.

#### ARTICLE VI—Missions Committee

SECTION I. The Missions Committee shall be composed of a Director and eleven additional members recommended by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association in annual meeting. All mission work sponsored by the Association shall be under the supervision and direction of the Missions Committee.

SECTION II. Duties of the Missions Committee:

1. This Committee shall, when a vacancy occurs in the office of Superintendent of Missions, recommend a successor based upon the approved job description, to the annual meeting, or to a special called meeting of the Association.
2. It shall work in cooperation with the Director of Missions of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.
3. It shall supervise the activities of, and work with, the Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association.
4. It shall meet quarterly receiving written monthly reports from the Superintendent of Missions and make suggestions to him concerning the work of the Association.
5. It shall advise any group seeking to organize a mission or church.
6. It shall assist, upon request, churches with particular problems.
7. It shall maintain awareness of the mission needs of the churches in the Association and be ready to recommend ways in which these needs may be met.

8. It shall prepare and present a budget to the annual meeting of the Association.

SECTION III. The Missions Committee shall recommend to the Association for approval a job description for the Superintendent of Missions, who will serve as ex officio member of all committees.

#### ARTICLE VII—Steering Committee

SECTION I. The Steering Committee shall be composed of the Vice Moderator as chairman, the pastors of the member churches, and two lay members elected by each church and named in the associational letter.

SECTION II. The responsibilities of the Steering Committee shall be:

1. To meet quarterly with the Executive Committee to consider the Kingdom work in the Association.
2. To assist in the promotion of the work of the Association in the churches.
3. To assist committee's reports in acquainting the churches with different phases of the work.

#### ARTICLE VIII—Other Committees

SECTION I. The following committees shall be composed of three or more members each. They shall be appointed by the Moderator and the Committee on Committees, at the annual associational meeting, to serve in the ensuing year and for the next annual meeting.

SECTION II. Duties of these committees shall be:

1. Committee on Committees: To work with the Moderator in the annual session in the appointment of committees.
2. Nominating Committee: to nominate the associational officers and recommend to the Ex-

ecutive Committee replacements for vacancies occurring during the year. Nominees shall first have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.

3. Committee on Reports:

a. This committee shall inform our people about the work they have been chosen to represent and lead in promoting it.

b. They shall make brief written reports to the annual associational meeting.

c. This committee consists of a member for each of the following phases of work: Evangelism, Cooperative Program, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

4. Program Committee:

a. This committee shall prepare a printed program for the annual associational meeting, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors.

b. This committee shall, in the opening meeting, present the printed program for adoption with necessary adjustments.

5. Committee on Places and Preachers:

a. This committee shall recommend the time and place or places for the next annual associational meeting.

b. This committee shall recommend the preachers and alternates for the Associational Sermon and the Missionary Sermon.

6. Constitutional Amendment Committee:

a. This committee shall consider and recommend changes in this Constitution which have been referred to them in the regular annual meeting.

b. This committee shall recommend changes in this Constitution that become necessary for clarity and for the proper functioning of the associational work.

7. Committee on Resolutions:

a. This committee shall consider and present to the annual association meeting any resolutions referred to them.

b. They shall prepare and present any further resolutions deemed expedient to them.

8. Youth Committee:

a. This committee shall work with, in advisory capacity, the youth of the Association.

b. They shall promote programs that are of interest to the youth, such as music festivals, camps, retreats, study courses, fellowships and the like.

9. Ordination Committee:

a. When so requested by a member church, they shall examine any candidate for the gospel ministry, in matters of life, doctrine, personal faith, cooperation, and any others relating to the ministerial call.

b. Upon approval, they shall recommend the ordination of this candidate.

10. Seminary Extension Committee: they shall promote & direct the Seminary Extension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director & Registrar annually. They shall appoint teacher in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for classes in this program.

## ARTICLE IX—Annual Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be on Thursday and Friday following the first Sunday in August.

## ARTICLE X—Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting on the second day. (this statement be amended to read as follows:)

1. This constitution may be amended in the following manner:

Notification of the proposed amendment shall be made in writing to each Church in the Association not less than thirty days, and not more than sixty days, prior to the annual meeting, such

notification coming through the Associational office.

2. A copy of the proposed amendment shall be provided to each messenger present for the first session.

3. A first reading of the proposed amendment must be approved by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the first session of the annual meeting. All changes, if any, to the proposed amendment shall be presented to the assembly at the first session prior to this first reading vote.

4. A final approval of the amendment shall be by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the second session of the annual meeting.

## ARTICLE XI

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned.

Amended to read as follows:

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned, except where it may be in conflict with this Constitution.

## ARTICLE XII (Added Addition)

Certified copies of this Constitution as amended shall be filed with the office of Superintendent of Missions, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, the Association Historian, and not less than one copy placed in a safety deposit box in a local bank.

# Proceedings

Thursday, August 7, 1975—Night Session

(1) The one hundred seventy-eighth annual session of the French Broad Baptist Association was called to order by Moderator Bruce Phillips on Thursday, August 7 at 7 p. m. at Chapel Hill Baptist Church.

(2) Mrs. Dorothy Roberts, Associational Music Director, led the congregation in singing "When We All Get to Heaven."

(3) Rev. Roger Slagle, Pastor of Chapel Hill Church, gave the devotions taking his scripture from Romans 12.

(4) Rev. E. J. Jenkins made a motion the program of the association be adopted with any needed corrections or changes. This was later seconded and adopted.

(5) Rev. Jenkins was asked to recognize new pastors. There were no new pastors in the association this year. However, several pastoral changes were made within the association itself, and some men in the association were ordained. Rev. Roger Slagle (Chapel Hill) and Rev. Joe Tomberlin (Laurel Valley) were ordained. Rev. David Allman (Long Branch), Rev. Arthur Ammons (Paint Gap) and Rev. Joe Sprinkle (Alexander) had either changed churches in the association or had left the association but returned this year. Mr. Bob Russell was called as Minister of Music at Mars Hill Baptist Church. At present there are seven churches in the association without pastors.

(6) Rev. Jenkins made a motion the Nominating Committee Report be adopted. This motion was seconded and the report adopted.

(7) Mrs. Charlie Clayton made a motion the Cooperative Program Report be adopted. Mr. Bob Broom from the Baptist State Convention gave a response to the report using as his text Acts 4:32 and the theme "Together for Christ." The report was adopted.

(8) Mr. Joe Keller gave the Sunday School Report and made a motion for its adoption. The report was adopted.

(9) Roll call of the churches was made at this time by the clerk. There were 147 persons present with 31 churches represented.

(10) Mr. Wade Huey led the congregation in prayer.

(11) Mrs. Dorothy Roberts then led the congregation in singing "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus" at which time an offering of \$87.86 was taken.

(12) Rev. Worth Emory made a motion the North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging Report be adopted. Mr. Kenneth Mullins gave a response to the report using scripture from Psalms 71. He spoke briefly on the new retirement home to be built on the Pearson Estate in Asheville at a cost of \$1,000,000. He showed an architect's sketch of the completed home and grounds. The report was adopted.

(13) Mrs. Locke Robinson made a motion the WMU Report be adopted with one correction. Lottie Moon offering should be \$13,706.71 rather than \$13,406.71. The report was adopted.

(14) Rev. Jenkins was recognized to lead the Highlights of the Church Year. Mrs. Janie Franklin of Chapel Hill stated they had dug a well, completed rest rooms, and remodeled inside and out this year. Rev. Jay Blankenship from Laurel Branch stated they had 10 baptisms, 19 additions by letter and their attendance had doubled. They had also purchased an organ. Rev. Jack Burnette from Forks of Ivy stated they had paved their new parking area. Rev. Gordon Ball from Belya stated they had built a new 240 seat auditorium, 6 classroom church valued at \$85,000 to \$100,000 with only a \$4,000 debt at the year's end. The building is electrically heated with wall-to-wall carpet. Mr. Grant McDarris from Bull Creek stated they had built a new auditorium. Rev. J. C. Wilson from Mt. Sheba stated they had 22 baptisms, with 31 additions by letter. They have also doubled their auditorium in size. Rev. Sherman Tweed from Oak Grove stated they had 6 baptisms with 19 added by church letter. They have extended their auditorium 18 feet. Also, they have established a WMU and a Brotherhood.

(15) Mrs. Roberts led the congregation in singing "He Leadeth Me."

(16) Mr. Woodrow Hill spoke at this time on the BIBLICAL RECORDER. He urged the churches to put the RECORDER into their church budgets. The RECORDER is now going into 112,000 homes.

(17) Rev. Spencer LeGrand, pastor of Marshall Baptist Church, brought an outstanding missionary sermon using as his text Matthew 28.

(18) Mr. Boyd Hill adjourned the evening session with prayer.

#### FRIDAY, AUGUST 8, 1975

(1) The French Broad Association was again called into session at 9:30 a. m. at the Bethel Baptist Church.

(2) Since the music director was unable to attend, Rev. Lester Murphey was called upon to lead the congregation in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms."

(3) Rev. Don Gasperson, pastor of the host church, welcomed each one present.

(4) Rev. Charles Smith, interim pastor at Piney Mountain Church, brought the devotions. He gave the highlights of his trip to the Baptist World Congress. His theme was "New People for a New World through Christ," and he used 2 Corinthians 5:11 as his scripture.

(5) Rev. Jenkins made a motion the Baptist Hospital Report be adopted. The motion was seconded, and the report adopted. Rev. Calvin Knight from our Baptist Hospital gave a response to the report.

(6) Rev. Sue Fitzgerald gave the Christian Education Report stating she would be assuming the position of Director of Christian Education Ministries at Mars Hill College on October 1. One of the main responsibilities of the new position is to be of help to the churches of our area upon their request. Rev. Spencer LeGrand stated he felt this was a big step for our people, and we should support Rev. Fitzgerald and her efforts with our prayers. Mr. Proctor from Gardner-Webb College and Mr. Robert Melvin from Mars Hill College gave responses to the report. Mr. Melvin gave some dates at Mars Hill College which might be of interest: October, 13-14 Dr. Carl F. H. Henry, a lecturer, will be speaking, and November 15 is RA Day. On November 21 January Bible Study is being taught and in late January Dr. Leighton Ford has been asked to conduct a campus revival. A motion was made to adopt the Christian Education Report; it was seconded and adopted.

(7) A motion was made for the adoption of the Baptist Church Literature Report. This was seconded and the report adopted.

(8) The congregation was led in singing "There Is a Name I Love to Hear."

(9) Rev. Jenkins made a motion the Bible Camp Report, the VBS Report, and Take a Look be

adopted. The motion was seconded and the reports were adopted.

(10) Rev. Lester Murphey made an announcement regarding the fight against pornography by the Christian Action League. He requested that money to fight pornography be sent to the CAL in Raleigh.

(11) Rev. Jenkins requested that the recognition of Miss Dorothy Sprinkle entitled "Praise (There is Joy in Serving Jesus)" be included in the minutes.

(12) Rev. Charles Smith made a motion the Baptist Children's Homes Report be adopted. Mr. Clyde Morris gave a response to the report. The report was seconded and adopted.

(13) Rev. Jenkins made a motion the Home, State and Foreign Missions Report be adopted with one correction—the Lottie Moon Offering should be \$13,706.71 rather than \$13,406.71. The motion was seconded and the report adopted.

(14) Mrs. Janie Franklin made a motion the Civic Righteousness Report be adopted. The motion was seconded and adopted.

(15) Mr. Walter Harrell moved the adoption of the Annuity Board Report which was seconded and adopted.

(16) A motion was made to adopt the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. Report. This motion was seconded and the report adopted.

(17) Rev. Worth Emory made a motion the Evangelism Report be adopted. The motion was seconded and the report adopted.

(18) Rev. Charles Rogers moved the adoption of the Missions Committee Report and the Associational Budget which were seconded and adopted.

(19) Mr. Vance Edwards gave the Treasurer's Report. A discussion followed regarding the way in which the balance in the treasury for the printing machine would be used. It was stated it would be used for other needed equipment for the Associational Office. A motion and second was made to adopt the report, and it was adopted.

(20) Miss Sadie Wallin made a motion the Stewardship Report be adopted which was seconded and the report adopted.

(21) Rev. Jenkins made a motion the Superintendent of Missions Report be adopted. The motion was seconded and adopted.

(22) The congregation joined together in singing "Love Lifted Me" while an offering of \$45.43 was taken.

(23) Rev. Homer Tomberlin brought an inspiring associational sermon taking his scripture from Galatians 1:8-9 and using the theme "Being Victims of Wrong Information."

(24) Dr. Hoyt Blackwell gave the blessing and the meeting was adjourned for lunch.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

(25) Rev. Stanley Peek, Vice-Moderator, brought the final session of the French Broad Baptist Association to order. The congregation sang "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart." Rev. David Allman, pastor of Long Branch Church, gave the devotions taking his scripture from Luke 10.

(26) The clerk gave the Digest of Church Letters. A motion and second was made to approve the Digest, and it was adopted.

(27) Dr. Evelyn Underwood gave the Historian's Report. She stressed the importance of celebrating our heritage of work next year in our churches during the Bicentennial Observance. The report was adopted.

(28) The highlights in some of our churches this year were given. Bethel reported their spiritual growth was the greatest challenge this year. Piney Mountain did landscaping, stoned their parking area, and painted their building. Ivy Hill did work on their parking area; however, the greatest thing they did was to see persons accepting Christ and growing spiritually. Mars Hill installed a ramp for the handicapped to enter the building by wheel chair. Oak Ridge purchased more land and have money to start building. Oak Grove has launched into a new building program. Little Ivy paved their parking area. Hot Springs had a good Vacation Bible School. Their building fund has reached \$24,000 and is growing.

(29) It was announced that the pastor's wives have organized this year in the association and are meeting monthly. All pastor's wives are urged to attend.

(30) The Church Training Report was given by Mr. Walter Harrell. A motion was made and seconded and the report was adopted.

(31) Rev. Jenkins moved the adoption of the Brotherhood Report. The motion was seconded and the report was adopted.

(32) A motion and second was made for adoption of the Music Report, and it was adopted.

(33) The Librarian Report was adopted. It was announced that a mobile church library is available by request from the Associational Office.

(34) Mr. Bruce Phillips gave the Executive Committee Report. A motion was made, seconded, and the report adopted.

(35) Rev. Stanley Peek moved the adoption of the Steering Committee Report. The report was adopted.

(36) Rev. Lester Murphey gave the Seminary Extension Report. Rev. Worth Emory, Rev. Jack Burnette, and Mr. Vance Edwards shared some thoughts on what Seminary Extension has meant to them. The report was adopted.

(37) Rev. Richard Price stated there had been no requests for new churches to enter the Association; hence, there was no report from the Reception of New Churches Committee.

(38) The Constitution Amendment Committee Report was adopted.

(39) A motion was made for the adoption of the Ordination Committee Report, and the report was adopted.

(40) The Committee on Committees Report was adopted.

(41) Mr. Harvey Franklin read the Places and Preachers Committee Report and it was adopted. The 169th annual session will be held with Gabriel's Creek on Thursday night, August 5, 1976, and at Belva Church on Friday, August 6, 1976.

(42) The Resolutions Committee Report was adopted.

(43) The Memorial Service honoring our beloved dead was led by the clerk. She used scripture taken from 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18.

(44) Rev. Jenkins installed the officers for the new year.

(45) The congregation sang "Heavenly Sunlight."

(46) Rev. Jenkins brought the closing remarks.

(47) Rev. Stanley Peek gave the benediction, and the 168th annual session of the French Broad Baptist Association was adjourned.

## NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

There has never been a year in the history of our Baptist Homes when more people have sought the services of the homes. Today there are some 21,000,000 Americans 65 and above, and this number is expected to grow by over 300,000 a year in the years ahead.

Although our Baptist homes can minister to only 230 persons at any given time, they have served hundreds of aging people during the past twenty-four years at Resthaven, the Hayes Home, and the Nursing Care Unit, in Winston-Salem, and in our homes at Albemarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville.

Gifts for 1974-75 through the Cooperative Program and through the third Sunday of February Offering for the homes, reflect a very encouraging increase. Signs for the future indicate that our homes will need greater financial support from our Baptists than ever before.

The newest development for our Baptist homes during the past year has been the purchase of the Pearson Estate near Asheville. This will be the future site of the Western North Carolina Baptist Home. The plans for this home include 50 rooms for residents, with living room, dining room, library, chapel, and activities room, and other necessary rooms. Upon completion of this home, North Carolina Baptists will be enlarging their base of ministry to almost 300 persons.

Pray for the ministry of our Baptist Homes for the Aging, and give as liberally as possible, knowing that your ministry to even one of these older people is a ministry as unto Christ Himself.

She has agreed to help again this coming year in this area of work.

The Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions was \$5,448.90. This was the most we have ever given. The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering from all the churches for Foreign Missions was \$13,706.71. The Heck-Jones Offering was \$629.00. The usual \$1,000.00 was sent toward the support of Charles Buckner, our missionary in Indonesia. Fifty dollars was given to our Superintendent of Missions, Rev. E. J. Jenkins, for material for Bible Schools for the Association, and sixty dollars was given to our Associational Camp.

## BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

There have been many significant developments, in several different areas, at your Baptist Hospital during the past year.

The new ambulatory care unit is open, making possible enlarged and improved services for the Emergency Room, Outpatient Clinics, Physical Therapy and other departments. Renovation of the West Wing will be complete and renovation on the South Wing will begin in early August. The third floor of the Progressive Care Unit has been remodeled to provide 26 beds, therapy room and other improved facilities for psychiatric services.

The long-awaited EMI-scanner is now in use and is already proving beneficial in detecting blood clots, tumors, strokes and other abnormalities of the brain.

A Family Practice Center opened July 1, 1975 to offer more primary medical care for patients and also to provide specialized training for physicians who choose to enter family practice.

Despite the continued rise in costs for services and materials, the hospital has been able to operate in the black.

Gifts from the Baptist churches have been very gratifying. During the calendar year of 1974 the Hospital received \$258,898 through the Cooperative Program and \$392,000 through the Mother's Day Offering.

The Department of Pastoral Care has opened a counseling center in Raleigh, its second satellite center. Plans are developing for a third satellite in the western part of the State.

During the past year Mr. Reid T. Holmes retired as president of the hospital, after serving in the hospital administration for 29 years.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

In February, 1975, an important conference was held in Richmond, Virginia involving Foreign Mission Board administrative personnel and presidents of colleges who represented the Education Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention. The purpose of the meeting was to establish better communication between the Foreign Mission Board and Baptist colleges with the emphasis on the college involvement in foreign missions. For the last several years the Education Commission has had an emphasis on recruiting, training and preparing students as vocational Christian workers. The meeting this year has as its high priority the concern for foreign mission volunteers.

Dr. Ben Fisher, Executive Director of the Education Commission gave a report of this meeting in the May-June, 1975, SOUTHERN BAPTIST EDUCATOR. The conclusion of the conference was a seven point agreement toward which colleges could work.

- I. Colleges can help in recruiting and training the vocational Christian worker.
- II. Colleges can work with furloughing missionaries; participate in Missionary-in-Residence programs, help missionaries with continuing education and give guidance to missionary children.
- III. Continue to study college involvement in summer missions and the foreign mission journeyman program.
- IV. Study ways for recruitment of career and short-term missionaries for overseas teaching assignments.
- V. Help with study and planning of mission strategy.
- VI. Encourage students to contribute to world relief program.
- VII. Broaden world mission plans for the rest of the century.

The early 1971 emphasis on recruiting vocational Christian workers has had a direct bearing on the increase of Christian workers. We hope this latest meeting in Richmond with the Foreign Mission Board will eventually help to show an increase of foreign mission recruitments.

The RECORDER is available to church groups by subscription for \$2.50 per year. This is less than five cents per week. This is about the only bargain left in our society.

About a year and a half ago a Christian friend gave me a gift subscription to the RECORDER, and I feel that much of my Christian growth can be contributed directly to reading the RECORDER. Pastors, deacons and church leaders, if you do not have a BIBLICAL RECORDER Church Budget Plan in your church, may I encourage you to put it in your church budget.

I would also like to call your attention to our own publication in its new offset format, "News and Views of the French Broad Baptist Association." Any church member of the French Broad Association can request their own copy, and it is free to all church members. (You can't beat that price.) I want to extend congratulations to the Association on readability of its publication, thanks to the new offset press. In talking with an offset press salesman recently I understand that Reverend Jenkins had purchased the old mimeograph machine for fifty cents. However, there had been a

problem—collecting the fifty cents. A historical study of the Southern Baptists shows one thing: That we would not be what we are or where we are as a denomination without the influence of Southern Baptist literature. May I encourage each church in the French Broad Association to look at their teaching program, and remember Christ's commandment of teaching all nations so that we may save men's souls by any means possible—including the printed word.

## TAKE A LOOK!

We have 34,780 Southern Baptist Churches. There were only 69 new churches started in 1974. We have 12,297,346 Baptist Members in the Southern Baptist Convention. We had 410,580 baptisms. This is 3,000 less baptisms than we had the year before. There were 9,000 churches that did not have any baptisms. We had 7,200,000 in Sunday School. We have 5 million people in our Southern Baptist Convention who are not in Sunday School. In other words it took 4 churches to

enroll one new person in Sunday School this year and Vacation Bible School alone uncovered 1,200,000 prospects. There are 490 church type missions yet it took 70 churches to start one mission.

In our Association we had 14 churches reporting no baptisms. We had 13 churches without any additions. Our membership decreased this year by 500. We had 19 churches not supporting the Cooperative Program yet our total missions gifts were up \$8,357.00. We gave a total of \$26,087.00 through the Cooperative Program. Our total receipts were up \$82,000.00 yet we only reported 421 tithers out of 8,003 church members. It took the average of 44 Baptists in our Association to win one person to the Lord this year. We only have 16 churches who have a training program for their membership. We have 17 churches who have a definite mission emphasis in their church. We have only 6 churches providing an outreach for the men in their church. We have 11 churches who gave nothing to the support of the Associational Missionary. These are some things which need to claim our attention and a place in our prayer life.

## PRAISE (THERE IS JOY IN SERVING JESUS)

The above is Miss Dorothy Sprinkle's theme song. Almost every aspect of her life at home, in the church, and in the Associational Office is devoted to the service of Jesus. "Useful Work" is mainly in the area of using her talent for God.

The Associational Office has been greatly enhanced since she has been giving her time to help with the typing and many other things, and I mean giving, 1,646 hours. An hour at base pay (her work is far above this scale) would be around \$5,000.00 a year, yet she serves gratis, free, gives it for the joy of serving the Lord this way. Our Book of Reports is an example.

I, as Superintendent of Missions, we, as an Association, take this opportunity to say "THANK YOU MISS SPRINKLE FOR LOVING THE LORD'S WORK SO MUCH." God has called many people for many things. Thanks be unto Him for sharing you with our Association here in the French Broad Association. To God be the glory. Mat. 5:13-16.

## BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Christian child care provided by the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina is a cooperative mission. It was through the life, teaching and ministry of Christ and under the leadership of the Holy Spirit that North Carolina Baptists launched their child care ministry 90 years ago. Today it is recognized as one of the outstanding ministries of its kind in the nation.

The lives of more than 3,700 people were affected in a significant way through the services of the homes during the past year. Daily care and related services were provided 1,524 children. Of this number, 1,061 were in continuing programs while 463 received casework, counseling, and referral services. While we were caring for the children, a close working relationship was maintained with 2,178 adults in an effort to re-establish homes and strengthen family relationships.

New and exciting developments are in progress in Western North Carolina. The beautiful Broyhill Home campus will have a fifth cottage for children constructed during the next year. The Thermal Belt Youth Shelter, at Forest City, was opened last spring and is meeting a vital need for children needing immediate help. Several young girls are receiving care through the Maternity Home in Asheville. Increasing numbers of families are opening hearts and homes for the care of foster children. All of these indicate a living, vital and growing ministry to people.

Thank you for your dependable support in numerous ways. It shall be our purpose to keep this a dynamic ministry and to meet the needs of those for whom we accept responsibility.

## HOME, STATE AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

The faithful stewardship of individual Christians and the missionary vision of our churches, expressed through their support of the Cooperative Program enables Southern Baptists to maintain a growing World Mission Program.

The Home Mission Board sponsors work in the 50 States and Puerto Rico. At the beginning of 1975 the missionary force totaled 2,171 with most of the personnel employed under cooperative agreements with state conventions. Work is done with language groups, evangelism, church extension, pioneer and rural-urban missions, National Baptists, chaplaincy, metropolitan missions and others. The Cooperative Program provided \$6,806,954 for work in home missions in 1974. The Annie Armstrong Offering from this Association for 1975 was \$5,448.90.

All of the money from State Missions goes toward the work of the General Board. This includes the work of deaf ministries, city and metropolitan missions, church loans and lot aid resort missions, seminary extension, evangelism, chaplaincy ministries, etc. In addition, the State Missions Offering helps finance some needed buildings for the work of the Convention. Through this offering we have paid for the Canipe Building at Fruitland and are now paying for the classroom at Fruitland. The Association's State Mission Offering for 1974 was \$629.00.

The Foreign Mission Board reported 2,606 missionaries working in 82 countries at the close of 1974. During the year 250 new missionaries were appointed. Of all Cooperative Program (undesignated) funds for Southern Baptist Convention causes 49.53 percent went to foreign missions in 1974. Other than our Cooperative Program Offerings to Foreign Missions our Lottie Moon Offering was \$13,706.71. The annual \$1,000.00 was sent toward the support of our missionary in Indonesia, Charles Buckner.

## CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS REPORT

The General Assembly has been in session this year. A bill was introduced by Representative Dan Lilley of Kinston to close every beer joint in North Carolina at midnight. Under the present law these places can stay open until 2:30 in the morning from the last Sunday in April through the last Sunday in October. The bill failed to receive enough support in the House ABC Committee to pass.

A bill was introduced by Representative Jimmy Love of Sanford to strengthen the state-wide statute regulating the flow of pornography. This proposed change would have given the District Solicitor discretionary power in the matter of the adversary hearing, and would have defined hard core pornography in the Public Nuisance Section of the Law. This bill also failed to get the nod of the House Judiciary One Committee. We will be back in a later session with both of these concerns.

We continue to need your support. The most dependable thing to do is to place the Christian Action League in the budget of your church for a definite amount each month. As you do this, we will continue to be able to serve.

The League will be promoting Alcoholism Awareness Sunday in January and Highway Safety Sunday in August. Your support of these two efforts will help to save the lives of multitudes of innocent people in North Carolina. God created human life and thereby made it sacred. We are to recognize the sacredness of human life and seek to preserve it for God in every way that is possible.

The Annuity Board was established in 1918 to assist its pastors financially in their retirement.

This plan is also available to all full time church workers and ministerial students.

The retirement provides monthly income for life after retirement, or before if totally disabled. Widows benefit is now 50% of member's normal retirement benefit.

There are several settlements at benefit time if annual deposits were more than the minimum (\$400.00).

A hospitalization plan is also available to all full time church workers and their families.

At the present time there are 17 churches in our Association participating in the Annuity Program.

## THE N. C. BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. REPORT

Chartered in 1919 by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. has sought to assist individuals throughout the state in their estate planning, providing ways to support Baptist institutions and mission work on a permanent basis. Property and funds placed with the Baptist Foundation are invested by a convention elected board of directors with the income paid annually to the institution or mission cause designated by the donor.

During the past two years, \$330,070.41 has been given to the N. C. Baptist Foundation, Inc., in the way of annuity trusts. In this type trust, the donors reserve the right to the income from the investments for their lifetime and then the income will be paid to the Baptist cause specified in the original trust agreement. The laws of our land provide to the donor certain tax advantages for the gift portion of these transactions.

Wills still account for a major portion of the funds held in trust by the Foundation.

New gifts to be held in trust by the N. C. Baptist Foundation amounted to \$635,079.57 during 1974-75 fiscal year. Added to the market value of assets held from previous years brings the total value to \$2,331,559.67 as of June 30, 1975. Income from all assets held by the Foundation which have been or will be distributed to designated beneficiaries in the near future amounted to \$76,257.82 for the past 12 months.

## EVANGELISM REPORT

All churches will receive Proclamation '76 Planning Calendar booklets for 1975-76 and other revival materials. Each association is encouraged to plan a Simultaneous Revival among the churches during the spring (March or April) of 1976. If you do not have a Simultaneous Revival, every Baptist church is urged to plan a dynamic revival effort in the spring of 1976.

The continuing response of youth and adults to Lay Evangelism Schools has been significant. In the past 3 1/2 years, 12,774 youth and adults have shared in this lay witness training from 1,007 churches and 55 associations. Also, 107 pastors from nine other associations have participated in Pastor's Retreats dealing with Lay Evangelism Schools. Five other associations have planned Lay Evangelism Schools during the fall of 1975.

"BE RECONCILED TO GOD AND MAN" was the theme of the 29th Statewide Evangelism Conference at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, February 3-5, 1975. Over 2,400 pastors and lay persons heard excellent speakers emphasize various phases of evangelism.

Youth Ministries Week was held at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly during June 9-13 for 520 youth and adults with the emphasis on evangelism, vocational guidance, and recreation.

About 14,000 youth, pastors, and adult leaders will attend the 5th Statewide Youth Evangelism Night—August 15—at the Greensboro Coliseum. Dr. Bill Self, Atlanta, Georgia, is the guest preacher, and Bill and Linda Cates are the guest musicians. Christian youth continue to share a strong witness for Jesus Christ across our state.

The Division of Evangelism is cooperating with the Brotherhood Department in Lay Renewal Weekends and Renewal Evangelism.

Let us rejoice in the leadership of the Holy Spirit in wonderful revival meetings, city-wide crusades, and evangelism clinics during the past year.

The 30th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be at the Civic Center Auditorium, Asheville, during February 2-4, 1976.

Remember to pray daily for the work of evangelism in all the churches of our state, nation, and world.

## HISTORIAN'S REPORT

As our nation celebrates the Two Hundredth Anniversary of its birth, it is appropriate for the French Broad Association to look back at its history and to learn something of its own work over the past hundred years. According to records there were 18 churches in the Association in 1865, with a membership of 1,488. By 1875 this number had grown to 2,223 and by 1900 to 3,268. In 1974 there were 50 churches with a membership of 8,501. This growth in membership is particularly significant because population of the area has declined steadily during the decades since 1915.

Church buildings have been expanded and improved to meet the needs of the growing membership. In 1875 few if any had educational facilities in addition to the one-room sanctuaries, but in 1974 church property in the Association was valued at more than two and one-third million dollars (\$2,391,500.00). New buildings, enlargements of older structures, and improvements of all facilities account for these valuable assets.

Even more important than the growth of membership and improvements in physical plants has been the spiritual growth represented in new church programs and in greater gifts for work at home and for missions around the world. There are no records on pastors' salaries during the early years for the preachers received whatever happened to be taken in "the hat" at the close of the service. In 1900, however, records reveal that the total salaries for all ministers in the Association was \$666.00. In 1974, churches paid their pastors (in two cases there were other paid staff members also) \$180,892.00. During the early years few congregations felt any responsibility for carrying out the Great Commission. In 1865 the average contribution per church for all causes was \$1.50 a year. In 1900 the Association gave a total of \$32.41 to State Missions; \$38.05 to Home Missions; and \$11.85 to Foreign Missions. In 1974 members of the churches gave \$538,853.00 through church offerings, including \$24,271.00 for the Cooperative Program. They gave \$2,162.00 to State Missions; \$6,175.00 to Home Missions; and \$15,468.00 to Foreign Missions.

The Sunday School movement came rather early to the Association and by 1875 half or more of the churches had added the teaching program. In 1886 there were 364 enrolled in these schools. That number grew to 4,384 in 1974. In addition to the Sunday morning teaching service, 17 of the churches had Sunday evening training programs by 1974 and 38 of them had Daily Vacation Bible Schools during the summer of 1974. Seventeen (17) churches had organizations for the study and promotion of church missions.

Next year, 1976, will bring to a climax the nation's Bicentennial Observance. The Madison County Bicentennial Commission has designated Sunday, July 4, as a day on which all churches will celebrate our heritage of faith. Each church is asked to plan for that day and to make it a significant experience of thanksgiving and rededication to the faith for which so many have given their lives. It should be a time to remember, to be still and know our God and Father, and to make new commitments to serve Him faithfully.

Each evening was devoted to study of music theory, hymnology, and conducting a choir rehearsal. Music activities were provided for the children who attended with parents.

The Mars Hill Church has called a full time Minister of Music, Robert Russell of Chapel Hill, N. C. Mr. Russell and his wife will move to Mars Hill August 1. We look forward to their contribution to our Associational Work.

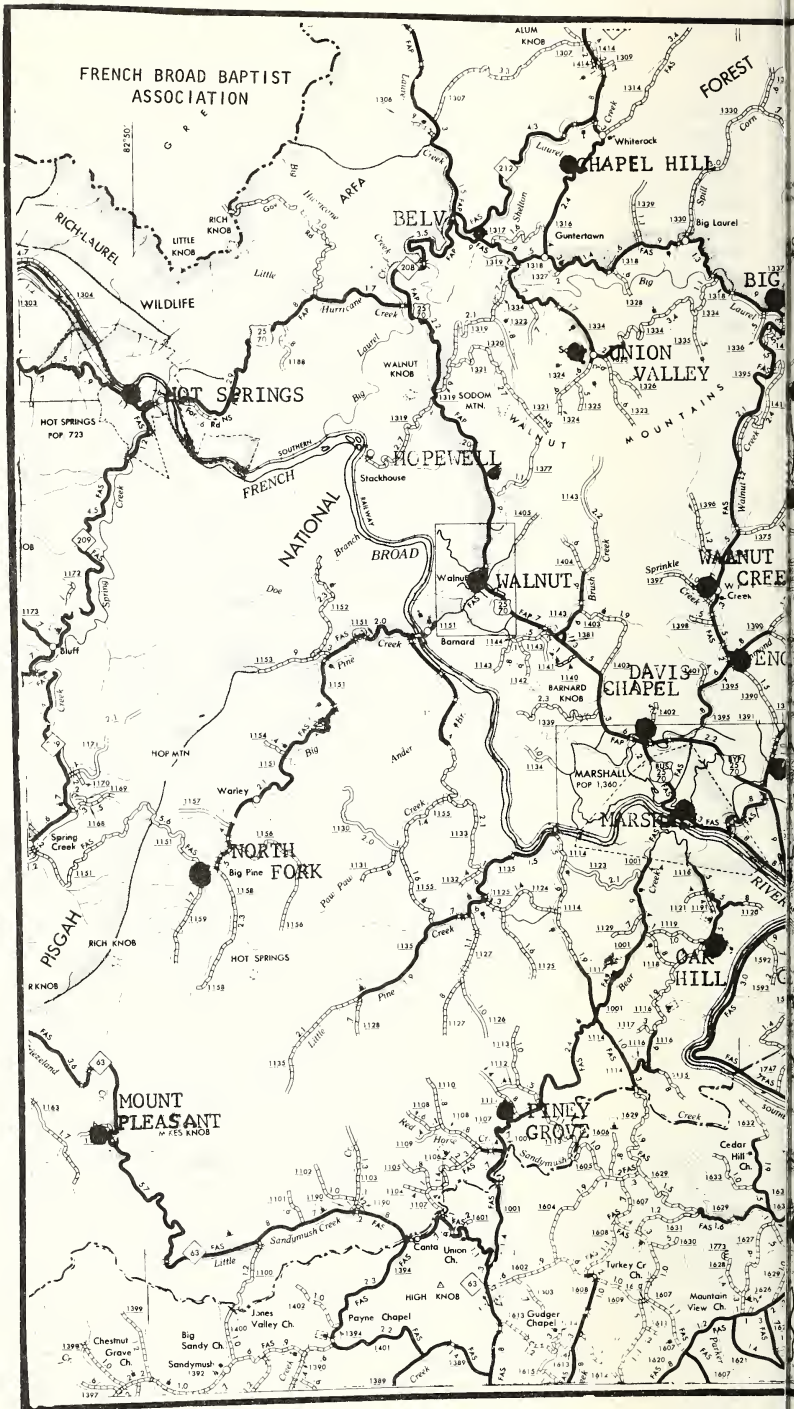
## LIBRARIAN REPORT

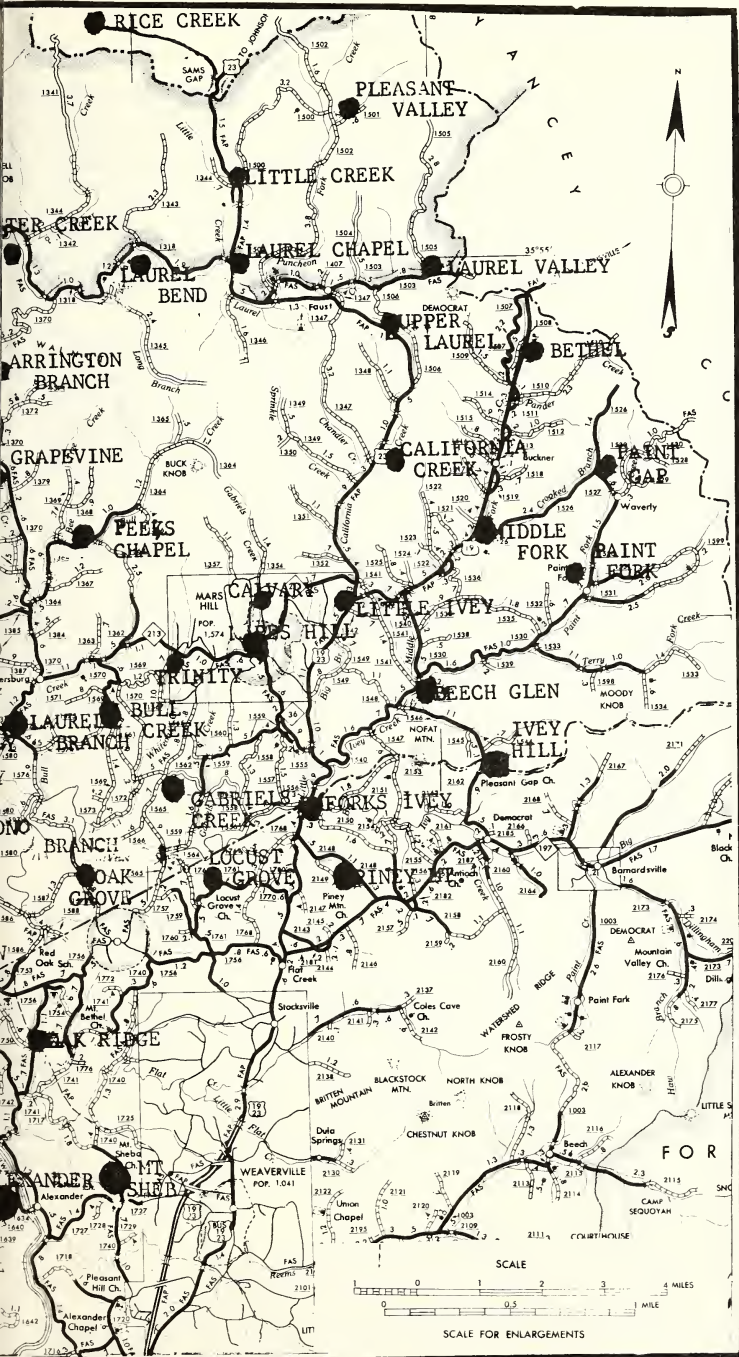

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee met in September, October, February, April and July of this year. Rev. Jenkins was given approval by the committee to move his residence and office during October, 1974. Both his home and office were relocated in the Marshall Area. It seems this has been of great value to the Association since more people have been able to visit and communicate with Rev. Jenkins.

The Committee approved the buying of needed equipment for the Associational Office—offset printer, addressograph, folding machine, and shaker. The offset printer was bought and paid for during the year. Too, the Calvary Baptist Church of Canton donated an addressograph to the Association valued at \$600 to \$800. The folding machine and shaker are to be bought when the proper ones are found.

The Executive Committee advocated the idea of sending letters to the Federal Communications Committee, 1919 M Street, N. W., Petition No. RM-2493, Washington, D. C. 20036 in support of religious broadcasting on radio and television. A petition has been presented to the Federal Communications Committee in an attempt to discontinue religious broadcasting. If religious broadcasting is stopped, the next step will be to discontinue the mailing of religious literature. The Committee also advocated the writing of letters to the National Aeronautic and Space Administration, Manned Space Center, Astronauts' Office, Houston, Texas 77059 to support the decision of the astronauts to read the Bible from their spacecraft as they orbited the moon in December, 1968. Mrs. Madalyn O'Hair (an atheist) has obtained 27,000 signed letters protesting this and plans to demand the astronauts be publicly censured for their act and that further demonstration of religion by public leaders be prohibited.

The Committee voted in July to send copies of the book WITNESSING TO THE WITNESS to each pastor in the Association suggesting its use as a study course guide. Letters were also to be sent to people on the associational mailing list asking them to purchase their own copies to help them understand the Jehovah Witness and ways to witness to him since this group is on the rise in our Association.

The Committee extended their appreciation to Rev. Jenkins for the job he has done so well this year.

Other general business matters of the Association were discussed and acted upon by the Committee. The Committee feels this has been a year of growth and development within the Association. Their prayer at this point is that the decisions made were influenced by God and that they carry His blessing. May they always keep the long view in mind and strive to make the French Broad Baptist Association an ongoing force for the work of His Kingdom.

Seminary Extension is an area of vital education whereby church leaders may receive training in their church. Our Association held fall and spring quarters. During the fall quarter the following courses were taught. Hebrews was taught at Walnut by Spencer LeGrand; at Upper Laurel by Sue Fitzgerald; at Piney Mountain by Joseph Godwin; and at Chapel Hill by Ralph Hogan. William Lynch taught the History of Christian Thought at Calvary. M. H. Kendall taught the Book of Acts at Oak Grove. Eighty-seven received credit and 142 attended.

During the spring quarter five courses were taught. Hebrews was taught at North Fork by Joseph Godwin and at Long Branch by Ralph Hogan. Sue Fitzgerald taught Christian Ethics at Mars Hill. At Madison Seminary Ralph Lee taught "The Life and Faith of Baptists." M. H. Kendall taught the Book of Acts at Paint Fork. Our enrollment for the spring was 116; 130 attended, and 89 received credit.

Several in our Association are nearing completion of requirements for certificates. The Seminary Extension Department has inaugurated new diploma programs. There are no longer three areas but two. The requirements of 16 courses per diploma are the same. The two areas are Pastoral Ministries and Educational Ministries Diplomas.

A special thanks goes to our churches for providing facilities and to our teachers who have stimulated our thinking. We look forward to another good year in Seminary Extension.
